



Hans Lindemann dreamt that the streets were covered with money Bills and coins lay scattered all around, but no one stopped to pick them up. Hans, who always inter-prets his dreams carefully, says this dream, that came to him twenty years ago, nurtured the idea for his Museum of American Treasures in National City.

"I knew I must stop to collect the treasures that other people passed by," says Lindemann. He has been a collector for most of his life and

since 1954 his small home has grown into the Museum. The bright yellow building sits high above the street on Fourth Avenue in National City. Tall pam-pas grass, and flower beds decorated with petrified wood, set it apart from the other small, faded homes along the street. Lindemann. a small, white-
