People hidden under brown parcels, with stacks of cards in each hand, didn't even glance at my tall red tripod with the Salvation Army shield displayed above it. It took me several minutes to develop a pleasant, rhythmic ring with

Salvation Army headquarters on Eighth Avenue, there was an old man sitting at a table there, carefully darning a sweater. There was a lady sorting the para-phernalia for the Army's bell ringers. And there was a very old woman standing there with what looked like bloody bandages on

The Army's city commander, Brigadier Robert F. Yardley, told me that the older woman had been working with them for

thirty-six years.
"Why don't you stay home and rest tomorrow, Mrs. B.?"

"I'll be in to work tomorrow, Lord willing. I can test up on Saturday." The woman straightened up and smiled at Brigadier Yardley. Struck with such an attitude

a man in khaki work clothes emptied his pocketful of coins into the kettle. "They help a lot of people, without a lot of

baloney."
"Do pennies help?" An eight year-old girl rolled up her Stingray bike and held out a fistful of coins. "I had six dollars, but I spent 50 cents each on two of my teachers, got these army men for my brother, and these six bottles of glitter to make tree decorations." She pulled out each of her purchases

from the bag to show me.

A postman dressed in jeans and a faded blue shirt paused to give me advice. "This is a bad location to stand. By the time those people wait in line an hour to send their packages they are too angry and frustrated to give. The woman who is here almost

The woman who is here almost every day only collects about three or four dollars a day."

At Mission Valley Center, the second step of my hell-triging experience. I held the heavy kettle in front of me to clear a path trough the crowd, and i set up my stand in the center of the mail. The competition in the center of this shopping plaza was rough. Across from my kettle, a trough of Gips South was truming corner, in front of the Bank of America, a singing group of eight housewives in caftans was getting ready to perform. Their plainst was waving her arms frantically and pulling the ladics into place. into place. Two clowns were distributing

free candy canes to children and were announcing a pinata party to be held the next hour. One clewn explained that the management of the Center had hired the clowns to entertain the children of shopping parents.
"Is this the Fountain Court?"

A tall woman in a long, flowered muu-muu asked. She held a big manila envelope with "Baja Mission Workers" handwritten

across it, "This doesn't look like the place I was last year," she searched around for a familiar landmark and wandered away. A few minutes later she re appeared pushing a curved formica counter and settled it directly across the walk-way from my kettle.

Pehaps one reason there was reflaps one reason there was this deluge of charity groups here is the fact that the adjacent Fashion Valley bans them. According to Harmen Harmenzon, the Salvation Army has no trouble going anywhere except Fashion Valley. "Fashion Valley offered us a gift wrapping booth but that won't help." Fashion Valley, in the person of a Mr. Bill Doyle, claims that

their shopping center is private property, that they decided on their ban because "the Hare Krishnas were literally sweeping women off their feet onto the women off their feet onto the concrete," and that "we are not apathetic—last year we spent over \$1,000 to promote a United Way drive."

A Salvation Army tho stopped to say hello. They were all students. One of them played a trombone, one a French horr, and one a trumpet. "Come down to Montgomery Ward before you leave and we'll play any hymn you'd like to hear."

me once, and I plan to pay them back a little each Christmas." She led her daughter away. On the way out to the car, I stopped at Montgomery Ward's and the trio fulfilled its promise. They played a somber version of "O Christmas Tree," which I hummed all the way back to the






# BOND'S bafflebox

### A Sidelong Glance and 16 Peeks

The Christmas crush is squarely on top of us. For moviegoers this is a mixed blessing. For, while it means that there are more new movies than can be covered, even movies than can be covered, even at the sustained pace of holiday hustle, it is traditional that at least three or four of the year-end arrivals qualify for the ranks of the Ten Worst Films of the year. However, there is no need to lose cheer until the wraps are off. The only sorriness, to this point, is for a few entertaining films — *Kid Blue*, *Ace Lii and Rodger of the Skies*, *The Pyx* — that were hustled on stage, to do quick jigs, preliminari and will certainly be lost, under foot, in the big parade of Christmas

The satirical thrust, in one instance, in the depiction of the Machine Age is cushioned, or deflected, by the disarmingly inane image of the Great American Ceramic Novelty Company its squat smokestack, its production linus of useless, gaily colored nicknacks, sombreros and Santa Clauses with British and American flags stuck in the crowns The quietness and calmness in the handling of silly happenings and silly characters create a delicate, reserved humor that is witty, or facetious, and never pushy, loud, or vulgar. The stablest source of this movie's fullness and balance is its performances, particularly that of Dennis Hopper, who holds down the lead role without pulling the other actors to his feet, who moves wirishly inside a stiff pair of


