In After The Fall, the two are linked: the hero appears doomed because his ambivalent attempt to save his once com-munist friend from investigation munist friend from investigation does not prevent his friend's suicide. But he is also fallen because of his marriage to Maggie. That Maggie is Marilyn Monroe holds greater fascination for audiences than any of its so-called metaphysical or

political messages. In the tele-vision version, the hero, played by Christopher Plummer, faced the audience head-on, eveball to eyeball, while the vignettes of his past were recaptured in little boxes to the right of him. The technique of addressing the audience works on the stage, but proved deadly on TV. Plummer did his best to appear earnest, serious, agonized, and the producers, fearful that you wouldn't realize that the action wouldn't realize that the action takes place in the concentration camp of the mind, impose the guard's tower of Auschwitz against the background as a recurrent motif.

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

The use of opus numbers is fairly recent. Bach never numbered his works. Hadyn and Mozart applied opus numbers haphazardly, and as their publishers applied some as well (selecting whatever number was free in the some as well (selecting whatever number was free in the print shop), the opuses are too confused to mean snything. This was especially a problem with Mozart, who, in the inconsiderate manner of genius, wrote an enormous amount of material in a short amount of time. It got very hard to establish the chronology when the man wrote three symphonies in six weeks. Ludwig wor filter Koehel managed to straighten out the Mozartian confusion. He compiled a wast chronological list and the numbers of this list are the Koehel ratings (Koehel-Verzeichnis, K. V., K.) which we can used when referring to Mozart's compositions.

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Bread Cheese Vinegar and Thou

As it must to all this season thoughts of preparing origina proportion to time. One year whe Renaissance-itis bloomed my Renaissance-itis bloomed early, I decided to start an apricot liqueur as early as July.
My dearest friend has an apricot tree whose fruit, sun ripened and picked at its peak, has no resemblance to the green-yellow stones in supermarkets. Succulent is the one word to describe the apricots from this blessed tree, and when it produced with remarkable fecundity she and I decided to try out hands at wine.

The use of the word liqueur in one sentence and wine in another is no accident. We were menting apricots and hoping for the best. My friend invested about \$50 in stoneware crocks, but I made do with a bean jar and a stoneware pitcher. True, I consulted with many of my friends who had turned out creditable cook my measuring in the palm of my hand. The recipes that were recommended to me appeared not only elaborate, but they violated my image of myself preparing something from rigid, specified

rules.

Having internalized the necessary ingredients. I opted for free form when it came to amounts. If mashed the apricots, threw in the sugar, added the yeast — how much of each no one, least of all myself, could tell. Then, with insouciance I wrapped the crock and the lightly covered pitcher in brown paper bags and brought them into the studio where I paint — presumably the vapors of turpentine and linseed oil could only add to the flavor.

unveiled my fermented mess and
smelled. No doubt about it, the
fruit had fermented. But it had to
be clarified by pouring it through
cheese cloths with stiffly whipped egg whites — the egg whites catcl the sediment. I tried a reasonable amount of egg whites, but the strained liquid still ran brown. What to do? In brief, I repeated the clarification process no less than three times, with at least 16 eggs. When done, I knew the color — an insipid brown — could not be improved upon. So I ventured for taste. Vinegar. Unadulterated acidic stuff.

Small matter. Technique is discovery and I had discovered apricot vinegar. I poured it into a clear wine bottle and set it on the counter. There remained just one problem: the color inhibited me from using it. You are doubtles aware of the correlation between colors and intake of food. In a controlled experiment, a filet mignon, colored with a black spotlight, was rejected by each participant as being inedible, though it had been prepared with lavish care. In like manner, my sienna colored vinegar gave me pause. True, I had had to abandon my fantasy of giving apricot wine/liqueur, but the vinegar as a gist was equally out of the question. Yet whenever I tried to bring myself to add it to a salad at home, I invariably refrained by telling myself I had to save it for a

Crush cloves with back of spoon - not with a garlic press - and add to bowl containing milk, buttermilk. Cover with plastic wrap. Set in warm place for 72

Place curds and whey into a piece of muslin (old sheet, pillowcase etc.) and let it drip into a collander with clearance under it to eatch watery drippings. rosemary and sage. Line plastitubs (from margarine, cottage cheese, etc.) with 4 layers of cheesecloth. Add cheese and herb mixture. The plastic tubs should have a hole in bottom for last minute leaks. Set in refrigerator. Turn into fancier molds or on to a dish 24-48 hours later. This is a

superb cheese and you will have 2 cups for less than a dollar. With the cheese, you can serve or give this equally fine bread.
Recently I tried a recipe that came from Robert Redford's wife. It produced neither a good bread nor Redford at my door. But the following oatmeal bread is feedered.

2 packages dry yeast I spoon sugar I cup rolled oats I cup scalded milk (cooled) 12 cup dark brown sugar (less if you prefer it less sweet) I tsp. salt

5 cups all purpose flour.

Dissolve yeast and sugar in warm water and add spoon of sugar. Combine oats in boiling water. Cool to lukewarm. Add to oats, yeast mixture and cooled milk. Stir well.

Add 4 cups of flour, one at a time. Knead dough, adding extra cup of flour until it is elastic and smooth (less than 10 minutes). Place into large bowl that is heavily greased with either butter or oil. (I prefer oil). Cover and set in warm place 1-2 hours.

After 2 hours, punch down and knead for about 2 minutes. Divide in half and place into greased loaf tins or on greased cookie sheet. Allow to rise again.

Bake in 375 degree oven about 45 minutes - bread should sound hollow when tapped with knuckle. For a soft crust, brush with butter when removed from over. For a tins, then return to oven for 5

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A SUTHERLAND DISCLAIMER

There has been a universal orgy of congratulation and self cor gratulation over Joan Sutherland's San Diego Opera. These feelings are understandable. When one has waited all year to hear a famous diva; when huge amounts of money have been spent to attract her — with baggage and husband - to this corner of the Far West; when the radio and the record stores are inundated with her ordings; when tickets are as precious as platinum and disappointed ticker seekers are before the Civic Theatre - how then could one admit that the performance itself was less than perfect, that in fact it was deeply flawed and often insufferable boring? There is no more heady experience than the estatic abandonment felt by an opera audience in the presence of a truly eager for such an experience that they will sometimes deceive their

sometimes do the same thing. It may therefore be of some use to not totally impaired by heroine worship, if I attempt to inject a few drops of reality into the emotional outpourings we have been flooded

with in the past couple of weeks.

Lucia di Lammermoor, let it be remembered, is a story about a marry a man she scarcely knows. driven to an insane frenzy in which she dispatches her bride-groom with a dagger, and finally reduced to exhaustion and death
— all by her beloved brother. The

story, with its cruelty and crime, story, with its cruelty and crime, its murder and madness, is scarcely a mild one; and the character of the heroine is full of agony and darkness. If opera is the musical representation of human passions in dramatic action, then Lucia must be numbered among the most operatio of opera. The the most operatic of operas. The emotional impact of a good performance of this work — a performance in which the torments of Lucia's emotional life are fully communicated through singing and action — is very great; it shakes you with pity and fear, it

is really aware that they are words, rather than annoying interruptions of the vocal flow. If you did not know the plot, if you were to shut your eyes and do nothing but listen, you would never garner the least idea of what is going on either in Lucia's situation or in her heart. All the notes are there, and sung with supreme ease and luscious vocalism; but there is no emotional communication whatever. It notable that Miss Sutherland is end of the first section of the mad scene — that is, in a piece of music without words, calling for purely vocal display, expressing to feel that a well sung cadenza can justify the whole opera; but for me opera is theatre, and music is emotion, and Lucia is tragic drama — and Joan Sutherland's performance is consequently little

they mean, or indeed whether she

As for the contribution of the impression that we were listening to a Sutherland recital, rather than a staged opera. Robert Hale, as vocal technique, when he did not force the voice; and Gordon Greer, in the tiny role of Arturo. diplayed a powerful and beautiful tenor voice reminiscent of Jussi Bjoerling's, though stolid in expression and ridiculously un-Bjoerling's, though stolid in expression and ridiculously un-ltalian in diction. But John Darrenkamp, as Lucia's brother Enrico, shouted at the top, brayed in the middle, and squeezed at the bottom; and the Edgardo of Franco Tagliavini was so limp and feeble (in spite of a pretty voice lying comfortably in the tenor range) that it was impossible to range) that it was impossible to understand why Lucia should have gone mad over losing him.
