

In the early days of electronic communication, audiences had no way of telling where their radio signals were coming from. Because the stations were all using the same frequency, they had to come up with ways to identify themselves—letters “call letters.” To avoid confusion around the world, the alphabet was divided among nations, and to the best of my knowledge, the United States fell in the middle of the letter “K.” The station west of the Mississippi took the letter “K,” those east of the river took “W.” However, in the early days of television, there was no national standard. So it was created so that some pioneer stations ignored the geographical boundaries and began calling themselves “K” stations. Now, with the FCC, EKA Pittsburgh, will begin its call letters with a “K,” Needham says, the FCC longer allows this sort of deviant behavior.

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
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South Bay Fish Café

We hurried south on Interstate 5 to National City in a red Ford. We took the 26th Street exit and drove two stops to National Avenue, where we turned to the southwest. Behind a Two Guys store, a tiny shopping center, past a place called Books and Jeans, we came to a stop.

There, on the extreme right was a tiny cafe, so we headed in. Cemetery Row, the name of the street, was the tiny room and two small tables had been set up. A man at the counter had just served a Coke and dessert and on top of a hot plate bearing the name of the establishment, which was netted, and a plaque bearing the name of the restaurant had been attached to the wall behind him. The waitress, a comely woman who wore a white apron over a dark dress, slacks, greeted one member of our party, who had one leg in a cast and used crutches.

"I see you got here on time," she said.

"Last time, we got here after eight. Ten after, and the cook who comes up daily from Tijuana, took a break and we had to wait another hour."

The waitress smiled shyly. "We're open until nine now and I'm more than happy to wait."

"And not getting paid properly," said her partner in the cast.

She shrugged her shoulders helplessly, and set the proper place mat, which had been folded in half, on the slatted wooden table.

"Any objection?" asked the waitress.

"Not for a cocktail or some new, but not for frying. You know how fussy she is." The waitress rolled her eyes and shrugged.
