Without warning, though, councilman Fred Schnaubelt plucked the item from the council's consent. Fred Schnaubelt plucked the item from the council's consent agenda — a position that usually assures approval without debate — and used it to test the council's feeling toward subsidized housing. It surprised no one that five of the seven legislators at that Wednesday session voted against the townhouse projects.

Neither is it a surprise that the two supporters of the Pacific Beach Drive and Noyes Street housing are liberals — Jess Haro, a Chicano, represents the South San Diego area, Leon Williams, a black, speaks for Southeast San Diego. Led by attorney Tom Dunnion. who lives in the area, and homeowner Mike Tellur opponents have asked the state Coastal Commission to deny the church's application for a building permit. They claim the

church has received "special erations" that would not be granted another developer. 'They've been given variances I couldn't get if I wanted to build there," charges Tellup "But it's like being against apple pie and motherhood to say

He's Not Bluffina

Jerry Kuhn, a geologist for Scripps Institute of Oceanography, has shot more than seventy rolls of film in the last few weeks. The subject of all those recent snapshots ha been the San Diego County coast, parts of which changed almost daily during the recent storms. The dramatic erosion wouldn't normally be a source of glee, except that Kuhn's ion of it supports documentation of it support position which he has long advanced: namely, that typical Southern California storms can chew up the coastline like children biting into birthday

cake at a party.
Until recently, data on coastal erosion in the San Diego area never has been very well correlated, and so several different theories about erosio have competed. One which has won popularity with the real estate salesmen of ominiums perched on the bluff edges says erosion occurs at some average, usually insignificant, rate, in the neighborhood of an inch or less per year. Recently, however, ne geologists have begun to wear away smoothly; instead erosion occurs catastrophically

earth can collapse in a second, they say, and severe storms car bring about such collapse So Kuhn's pictures are

eloquent witnesses. The recent storms pounded Del Mar the hardest, he says; damage there began during the October 22 storm, which removed sand from the base of the cliffs in the area, and dug away at the toe of the cliff slopes. Since then, rains have loosened the soil, and high tides have further base of the cliffs, reactivating old landslides in the south end of Del Mar (from Sixth Street south to the Anderson Canvon) Worried about its railroad track the Santa Fe Railroad December 30 installed a wooden seawall breaker at the base of the slope at Eighth Street, but storms two weeks ago scoured behind it and removed the toe of fill material placed there after a train went off the cliff during a huge 1941 storm. Furthermore, there's no sand left along the south end of Del Mar, Kuhn says, and the town has seen "a daily change in the landscape

Although Del Mar has suffered most. Kuhn says recent headlines in other North County papers also eerily resemble which ran in the early 1940s. Kuhn says Oceanside. now stripped of all its beach, is 'wide open for erosion." From the Encina power plant south to the Carlsbad state park, Kuhn has noted significant erosion at the toe of the slopes. On November 30, Encinitas saw its

biggest cliff failure in recorded istory when a 110-foot length of 30-foot-high cliff collapsed, and Friday most of the ground beneath a one-year-old \$100,000 stairway gave way The storms have also scoured Moonlight Beach and cut into an artificial berm near there, Kuhn says. In one section of southern Solana Beach, sands formerly piled against the high cliff wall have disappeared; now the cliffs are precariously

Kuhn is studying only the North County, but four months ago the city of San Diego also began regularly surveying its coast, and the storm has made its mark there too, officials report. Alligator Rock in La Jolla dramatically collapsed, and the weather also sculpted sections of Ocean Beach (south of the pier, at the end of Narragansett Street and at the end of Dei Mar Street). To the north, the heavily used Broadway Trail at Black's basch also reportedly has suffered significant erosion

Although the impact of such erosion is now being considered in several different coastal pians, neither Kuhn's nor the

city's findings are likely to produce any immediate effects Both say it will take months to analyze their data, and once analyzed, no one can predict how it will affect coastal building plans. In the meantime, however, Kuhn points out that more storms more rain, and more erosion may be on the agenda for San

California has been experiencing arough conditions for most of the past thirty years, extraordinarily fierce storms have enlivened its more distant past. Kuhn tells how in 1862, for example, one "Noahchian deluge" (it rained for more than forty days and forty nights) destroyed a quarte of all the state's taxable property. An 1884 storm dumped more than fifty inches of rain on Escondido and in greater-than-200-year rainfall This century, storms during the 1940s brought less rain, but surf occasionally topped forty feet (compare that to the twelve-foot reakers which wetted the shore here recently). experiment seems satisfied. The "fundamental school" is aimed at providing the type of grade-school education that was taken for granted during the 1950s and 60s. Teachers at the two schools, Webster in Southeast San Diego and Rolando Park in the State College area, stress the three Rs, grades, and regular homework assignments which are checked and signed by parents. Both schools adhere to a strict dress code for teachers and students alike; Rolando Park's code specifically bans jeans, thongs, long dresses, and

abnormal amounts of jewelry.
Actually, Rolando Park
principal Jim Manion and a group of parents began planning a back-to-basics program in 1975 when the swing towards alternative education — open classrooms self-naced instruction, multi-grade experiments - were peaking here. The parents drew up a model of a classroom experience which stressed traditional values, and Manio helped guide them through the maze of meetings required

before such a program is approved. There was little action on the proposal, though. until December, 1977, when the Board of Education seized on the fundamental school as a way to take the first step towards fulfilling a superior court decree that local schools be integrated.

The programs, modelled after similar schools in Pasadena and Charlotte, North Carolina, were then quickly approved by the school board. Ironically, it was this change of heart on the part of the administration that provoked skepticism by the Rolando Park parents, some of whom had committed two years to ostering the concept of a fundamental school. Toni Johnson, a Rolando parent wasn't alone when she worried aloud last June that busing and racial integration would cloud the "real" issue of a funda....ntal education for her children Today, Johnson, though an

outspoken foe of forced busing. admits she's "really pleased with the outcome of the Rolando Park experiment Actually, busing is nothing new to that elementary school. Since 1973, minority students from Murphy Canyon have been bused to Rolando Park, but in September Rolando Park s minority enrollment rose from fifteen percent to thirty-five percent. "Some of the kids (from Southeast) had a chip on their shoulder, others were frightened as mice," recalls Johnson. "Now everyone's attitude has melded together The experience has been similar at Webster Elementary, which was ninety-eight percent black and Chicano before it took on the fundamental approach last fall. Since then, white parents eager to enroll their children in just such a program have helped urn Webster towards a balance. Today, principal Jim Carroll reports that seventy percent of his students are minority, thirty

Webster's fundamental program is not as strict as Rolando Park's, but Carroll, a twenty-four year veteran of the school district who sports an American flag lapel pin. Bicentennial belt buckle and crew cut, and seems to know most all his 350 students by name, says it's working just as well. A visit to the classrooms lends credence to his claim.

In a sixth grade class,

students cluster in corners of the room without direct supervision, hard at work on a eading assignment. Down the hall, two second graders draw designs on construction paper which they roll up and staple to make miniature Indian tepees. The children work and chat together without regard to color and seem remarkably well behaved. Carroll admits the fundamental school concept was "the bait the district cast on Southeast and whites out of Pacific Beach and Clairemont Whatever the bait. Carroll is more than satisfied that education isn't suffering for the sake of integration.

If you should know of airplanes dumping fuel in your neighborthood, complain to the Lindbergh Field manager (Bud McDonald) at 231-5220 or to the Air Pollution Control District. 

thing heard at the doctor's. But then, K.C. Chan is not exactly your garden-variety product, faithfully ripened on the UCLA Medical School vine.

Dr. Chan was born, raised, and educated in the People's Republic of China. He attended the Wahan Medical School for five years, completing a medical program hased on and onented-towards Western-style practice. After graduation he was recruited from his class to participate in a special class at Wupeh Province Collego of Chinese Medicine.

The accelerated two-year course at Wupeh was an experimental program designed to produce physicians equally comfortable in either mode. Since the training was incorporated into a regular internship program, the pressures on the floteline, decroes were unusually severe.

"It was very fast. They really whapped us. We had to see patients on the side because we were already doctors and then we had to attend political meetings. They wouldn't let us rest. But now, when I think of it, it was a good thing. The training was really evod!

Even though Dr. Chan and his classmates were working as trained M.D.s. they were compelled to start again at the beginning. learnine how to apply sets of very basic laws, deeply ingrained in Chinese culture, regarding the nature of life 2nd man's felationship with the universe. There was also a new

relationship with their professor's body. I'm ever grateful to those professor. The first needle is always the hardest; it's so likely to bend, It's so fragile you're afraid that it may be broken. And then you're treating your teacher. It's nerve-racking. But after the first needle is a barrier.

Upon completion of his program. Dr. Chan discovered other difficulties less issily resolved than the "first needle." In addition to his workload and pay (about a hundred patients a day at \$50 to \$90 per month), he, like his patients, was forced to bend with the political winds sweeping over China.

"There's emotional stress because of the political pressure. You have to attend these stupid meetings all the time." There was also the fear that after spending years of study at government expense to learn a socially vital skill, he might suddenly be whisked away from his hospital and sent to the country to learn how to make compost one a sural form.

For this reason and others, Dr. Chan decided to flee China. At the age of twenty seven he slipped into the Pearl River and swam through the murky waters

Even the government of a city like San Francisco, noted for its libral policies and relargest Chinese population in America, could not suggest an acupuncture program without some angry disagreement. On December 30, 1977, a financial committee authorized the use of \$35,000 to establish an acupuncture mental health program, pending approval by the full board. It would make San Francisco the first city in Mancrac to sponsor acupuncture, which

It appears that some hospitals attempt to do this, but they are careful not te label the treatment "acupuncture." This lack of respect for the theory of Ch i has caused some problems. A local hospital called in Dr. Chan after a patient being treated for post-operational pain responded poorly to an electronic pulse machine commonly used by acupuncturists. The patient was told to hook himself up whenever the fell pain, but after one day he became listless and depressed. Dr. Chan was mo surprised.

"We know that if you take an acupuncture treatment even for lifteen minutes you're going to be so sleepy and relaxed. How'd you like to have that for sixteen hour?"

To prevent any such misuse by a licensed acupuncturist, the California Board of Medical Quality Assurance demands that any applicant must show proof that he has performed acupuncture for at least five years independently, or at least five years in a program affiliated with an approved medical school. These restrictions do not apply to physicians, surgeons, dentists, or podiatrists afready licensed in the state of California.

Dr. San C. Hsieh, another San Diego acupuncturist, believes that, in general, it is best for licensed physicians to perform acupuncture. He himself is a licensed physican, specializing in internal and inclear medicine. Although he thinks that acupineture works by stimulating the nerve endings (in accordance with the 'Gate Control Theory' advanced by a Canadian doctor), like Dr. Chan he must also adhere to the traditional system. The traditional philosophy creates a stumbline block for Western doctors since it is 'obsolete.'' Acupineture is not a total method of medicine, as the theory





Come Back **Miss Muffet** Spiders Aren't That Bao

To those among us having keen syee and lacking certain psychological handlicaps— such as a surreasoning fear of large, nasty-looking spiders— they are also available in local canyon. All their's enoded is a spade, a long stick, and some type of receptacle for the quarry. Just dig up a few gopher holes and you'll find one, eventually.

But for the less-industrious hunter, one disinclined to grub about abandoned rodent burrows out in the chaparral, a quick trip to the neighborhood pet shop will prove more practical. Many loca

will prove more practical. Many local shops carry them, for the Hairy Mygalomorph has become a hot tiem, recently increasing in popularity. "We're selling quite a few of these," attested Cal Joyner of the Blue Lagoon Pet Shop. "One we got these South American reci-leg tarantules in stock, they started moving. The local ones are just brown and ugiv. These red-legs are more attractive and people react to them more. Set one up in an aquarium — they lock really nice crawling around on a branch." Despite a bad reputation and a gift for making rather negative first impressions, the befty spiders we call tarantulas have somehow endeared themselves to many San Diego residents. "The demand for them this past year has been much greater

them this past year has been much greater then ever before," agreed Pam Sharp, owner of the La Pluma Pet Shop. "Usually the South American red-leg is the only type I carry, because the others are so readily available in someone's backyard Also, they're more docile than the local

On the subject of these, the largest spiders in the world, there is much confusion and no small amount of fear and oathing. First of all, the spiders Joyner and Sharp were referring to are not, in fact

tarantulas.
"They're selling Hairy Mygalomorphs," explained Dave Faulkner, curator of entomology at the Natural History Museum. "Tarantula is a bad term ecause the word tarantula, in the bechnical sense, refers to a type of well spider. The spiders we have here in the Americas are not true tarantulas, but selong to an altogether different family.

The word in question has its roots Southern Europe During the Middle Ages, around the town of Taranto, Italy,

The true tarantula belongs to the Lycosidae family, while the creatures of the Americas — Hairy Mygalomorphs — belong to the Theraphosidae family. The two resemble each other so much, and the differences between them are so subtle and technical, that even an entomologist would be hard-pressed to tell them apart. Small wonder that when European explorers were confronted by large hairy spiders in

were confronted by large hairy spiders in the Americas, they called them transtullas. Most people still do, but none of the pet shops in this area carries the original wolf spider with the Italian name. None of these big spiders, of which there are thirty or more varieties world-wide, should be referred to as insects. They belong to a class of animal called arachnids. "Soliders and Il upber grachnids, differ

"Spiders, and all other arachnids, differ from insects in many obvious ways," said Faulkner. "They have only two body parts, whereas insects have three: head thorax, abdomen. Another obvious tarantulas (to use the general misnomer) and all arachnids have eight legs; insects have six. Except for a few very primitive insects," he continued, "they all have two pairs of wings, which can be variously modified. But arachnids are more primitive; there is no such thing as a flying arantula. Also, the eves are quite spider has compound eyes. In fact, tarantulas have the worst eyesight of

almost any spider."

There is one other major, though less discernible, difference between the Hairy Mygalomorphs that people are buying in pet shops and the ants in your backyard. It regards the mouth parts: ants, like all insects, have mandibles; tarantulas have

fangs.

If, by some chance, you are bitten by a transula, or a Hairy Mygalomorph, fear not. "They have very little venom. If any, said Faultine." If you are bitten you can expect just a localized reaction and two fang marks. Their bite is probably less harmful than a bee sting. There are some in South America that are considered ideadly, but when I say that, I'm referring to a case where someone had an altergier reaction. Most people will have a reaction, but it won't be a serious one, just a little red bump, maybe some local swelling. Tarantulas, which may grow up to six inches in diameter, are different from most other spiders in that they do not spin a conventional web. They have silk, as all spiders do, but do not use it to each prey

spiders do, but do not use it to catch prey They may line the insides of their burrows but most of the time the silk is laid down haphazardly. Spiders leave a trail of silk wherever they walk. The tarantula is no exception and solrectimes will go on a silk-spinning binge.

"I've seen them cover practically half their cage with solid silk," said Sharp, "solid and thick, like a wad of cotton."

When one wants to eat, it crawls forth by night and runs down its meal, or wais for it to come by. "They detect ground vibrations," said Faulkner, "and are probably able to sense other things; they may sense heat; they may sense odors

given off by other insects."

Tarantulas, besides being nocturnal, have other habits of interest to potential owners. When feeling a need to defend themselves, or becoming irritated for any

reason, the spider will raise its two hind legs and scrape the hair off the top of its abdomen. For this reason many of those seen in pet stores have a bald spot there. "These hairs are easily dislodged," said Faulkner, "and can act as an irritant in the eyes of a lizard, say, or some other

Unfortunately, when it comes to their own kind, tarantulas are not very sociable. This makes breeding them, or even This makes orceding them, or even keeping two in the same aquarium, virtually impossible. This fact seems capecially two of the vorp pupulse South American red-legs. "We can't keep them together at all," said Joyner. "If we put two of these guys in the same aquarium

they fight."

A ten-gallon aquarium, set up for a deaert-type environment with a small water supply, makes an ideal home for these critters. So the local spider (and aquarium) merchants advise. But according to entomologist Faulkner, a five- or even three-gallon cage is quite sufficient. "You can line it with sand or bark," he said. "I just use kitty litter because I had it on hand."

The tarantula likes its privacy and prefers to live in a burrow, so a domestic prefers to live in a burrow, so a domestic tarantula might appreciate a few rocks in its aquarium to hide under during the daytime. Also, it prefers temperatures in the low seventies, and if one's house gets much colder than that at night, a small lamp will serve to keep the spider warm and contented. (Caution: don't cook your

Though not a picky creature, the Inough not a precy creature; the transitia likes to eat crickets, especially Jerusalem crickets. Once it has captured (and crushed) its dinner, it will take a very long time to feed. "What they do," said Faulkner, "is exertee a digestive enzyme, externally digest the cutice (hard outer layer or shell), and then absorb it. ulas have to take their food in liquid form because they don't have the mouth parts needed for chewing. All they have are those fangs."

For anyone squeamish about catching crickets and other insects, commercial food is available. Live crickets can be had a thousand at a time, but it's not really necessary to buy them. Said Paulkner, "You don't have to worry about feeding these things every single day; feed then whenever you catch something substantia whenever you catch something substant

— about once a week would be ideal.

Those bent on establishing a meaningful relationship with some Hairy biygaiomorph should be aware of the long-term responsibilities. Given good care (and barring unfortunate accidents such as the careless use of pesticides), a per spider may outlive any other domesticated animal. I don't know whether you're young or old (I mean over thirty), Saville but whatever your age you are a real old fogey. So what if that actor real old fogey. So what it that according to pronounce r's, or ch's, or any that came after another consonant, or any t followed by another consonant, or any I in the middle of a word? This isn't London, you know; it's San Diego What did you expect, Sir John

And then, you are an absolutely insufferable pedant. As if it mattered whether the Russian names were pronounced correctly I didn't acc any Russians in the audience, and no one else except a pedantic critic could tell the difference anyway, so what did it matter? Maybe that's the way nineteenth-century Russians really walked, tripping all the time. Finally, there is the tone of your review, which I find particularly repulsive. You seem positively angry at the way all those hard working, dedicated people at the Carter performed the Seagull. The way you talk about it, The Seagull is a tremendously great play, full of poetry, brilliant in its theatrical technique, with a dozen characters so full of human reality that they bring a whole lost world alive for us; a play scarcely to be matched in its profound understanding of the absurdity and unhappiness of existence. I don't know where you get ideas like that from. What I saw at the Carter was just another "classical" play nostly boring and pointless, with a lot of actors sitting around and talking themselves blue. If that's what Chekhov's like, why get so hot under the collar about a production that lets us all know quite honestly that those old Russian playwrights just didn't know much about writing for the
