Young Men. Ship Takedowns, and Property Values

've been thinking about brave young men and ship takedowns since that Ma-

Loma last week. Six marines and a sailor died. During my 16 years as a Navy SEAL and 3 as a member of a Marine airb outfit called First ANGLICO, I iogged more hours than I care to recall aboard the same kind of helo: a CH-46 Sea Knight.

I've done UDT swimme

I've done UDT swimmer casts and recoveries through the so-called helihole in the belly of the bird, parachuted and rapelled off the rear ramp. Each time my heart was in my threat. I never got used to the helish noise of the twin rotors, the blast of wind across the ramp, the sudden lurches as the pilot battled to maintain his bouse.

"A fast-rope is a hawser of braided synthetic fiber about 3 to 4 inches in diameter and 40 to 45 feet in length. The fast-rope is coiled and anchored in-side the helo. When the helo side the helo. When the helo comes to a hove, the crew hide tosses the rope out and you side down, one man after another. You wear heavy work gloves to grapp the rope and squeeze it to slow your fail — and that's what it is just a controlled fail — you hope. You should only have you hope the power of the rope, but if you're loaded down with equipment, you might also have to look the rope with your feet.

For the purposes of this Agreement only, Defined Gross Revenues does not include any proceeds from the sale, license, or conveyance of the right to broadcast or exhibit NFL pre-season, regular season, and play-off games to and on any other source, including, without limitation, local elevision, pay television, satellite encryption, international broadcasts, v other means of distribution

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

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

So if you're workgetting that, you might be making more money than you would at your regular job. But you can't retire or put your kids through college on your golden retriever. Unless you own the Taco Bell dog, of course. See, they want that specific dog now. They have to have that dog. So then you have a bargaining point."

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

Every Chaplain Has a Memory

"Let's go back to the very beginning, when you first heard about a chaplaincy program." On the phone is William Kolender, current San Diego County sheriff and former San Diego Civichie of police (September 10, 1975, through July 29, 1988).

The subject of our conversation is chaplains; specifi-cally, law enforcement chaplains. I've recently learned, to cally, iaw enforcement chaptains. I've recently learned, to my astonishment, that there are chaptains in the Drug Enforcement Agency, Marshaf Separtment, U.S. Customs Service, Border Fatrol, San Diego Harbor Police, San Diego County Sheriff Separtment, San Diego Police Depart-ment, Chula Vista Police Department, El Cajon Police Department, Chula Vista Police Police Police Police Novel Police Police Novel Police Police Police Novel Police Po

Kolender's voice is low and confidential, almost on th level of a barroom whisper. "Well, when I was with the police department we already had chaplains from the main denominations." Catholic, Protestan, and Jevelsh. They was more ceremonial then. Chaplains would do imposi-tions and benedictions, things like that.

"Everything changed after the shooting of jerry Hart-

less. [On January 9 1988, SDPD officer Jerry Hartless was mortally shot in Southeast San Diego.] He lived for a cou-ple weeks in the hospital. His family was very distraught, viously. Nobody believed he was going to make it, but

he lived longer than anyone thought.

"Mike MacIntosh [pastor, Horizon Christian Fellow ship] came to me and said, 'Could I be of service?' I thought, 'Why not?' He staved with the family for a week or so, I can't remember how long, but a considerable length of time. I was extremely impressed with his ability to help them through that ordeal. He didn't say, 'You've got to believe to give them faith and help. After that I asked him to be a ain. That was the start of it.

"When I became sheriff in 1995, I thought, 'What if we had a chaplain's program for all the employees throughout the county?' I got ahold of John Sorensen. He and I have been family friends for years. He's a retired Lutheran minister, very personable, very compatible, end handles people very well."

"Did you know what you wanted in a chaplain?" How Did you know what you wantee in a chaptain: Frow would I write that job description? For Hire: minister/rabbi/priest/monk/wiccan. Duties counsel persons who wear leather and carry 9mm handguns on the job. Familiarity with the leather-and-gun community a

"I asked Scrensen what he thought about having chap-lains at all the sheriff's stations. He liked the idea. To make a long story short, he worked with people in the department. They drew up what they would do, how they would do it, and gave me a copy."

"Remember when the PSA airliner crashed in North Park? It was September 1978. [One minute, forty seconds after 9:00 a.m., September 25, 1978, PSA Flight 182 crashed in North Park, killing 135 people aboard the plane, 2 in the Cessna that collided with it, and 7 on the ground. At the time, it was the worst aviation disaster in American history.] A lot of people died. We had somewhere in the neigh-borhood of 1000 individuals working that site: police, nurses, doctors, you name it. We had no psychological assistance. Subsequently, I believe, six or seven officers left the department because of the stress they experienced at the crash

"We did get psychological people in '80 or '81, I'm not too sure about the exact date. The crew was headed by Dr. Michael Mantell. Mantell became a part of our man team. To make a long story short, in 1984 I was still with the police department [its chief], and we had the mass in San Vsidro " (July 18, 1984, James Oliver Huberty, an unemployed security guard, advised his wife, "Society had its chance. I'm going hunting. Hunting humans." He left home and walked into the San Ysidro McDonald's shouting, "I killed thousands in Vietnam and I'll kill thousands mor Thereupon, Huberty murdered 21 people and wounded

another 19. He was finally stopped by a sniper's bullet.)

"My wife was out of town. I was going to dinner with my mother. I got a call from the dispatcher, she said some-thing about a shooting, I don't know how it went. Anyway, I had my mother driven home and I went down there.

This is the ungodly hour of 6:45 a.m., which in itself is bad enough, but I have already showered, dressed, driven, and parked, thus pushing the day's start clock back to 5:00 a.m. The cause of this self-inflicted discomfort is the eighth annual San Diego Jaw Enforcement and Emergency Personnel prayer breakfast. This year, the event is held in the Mission Valley Marriott's main ballroom.

I have come to interview one Mike MacIntosh, pastor of Horizon Christian Fellowship, a mega-church with a flock of 8500-plus, sprawling over four locations. The fellowship has a preschool, an elementary school, and a junior/senior high school; and that, believe me, is the merest tip of the Horizon iceberg. In addition to pastoral duties. MacIntosh is a sheriff's department chaplain, an SDPD chaplain, and chaplain to other entities, including, but not limited to, the San Diego Padres and San Diego Chargers.

The Marriott's sizable ballroom is full. Tables have been reserved for various police agencies: ATF, DA, DA Investigators, DEA, Marshals, Park and Recreation, San Diego Police Officers Association, nine separate departments from the SDPD, six departments from the sheriff's office, UCSD police, and U.S. Customs.

Onstage, Lighthouse, an outstanding five-piece bluegrass band, is playing traditional Christian tunes. There is the usual mumble-roar one hears when 200 people make verbal pleasantries at the same time. I turn around and pace oom seeking MacIntosh's hir. Three times we have made an appointment for an interview, three times his office has canceled. MacIntosh is a busy guy.

Busy guy or no, he's not leaving here alive until we talk, I move from table to table in quest of his scent, alert,

"We go inside. I go inside." The telephone is silent. The next sound is an involuntary shudder laced with grief. "It was a thousand times worse than PSA, because yo see. PSA was in your imagination. 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

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

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
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"There's a category of suicide called Death by Cop, where a person who wants to kill himself forces a police officer to do his work. MacIntosh pods, "Right,


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

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

"There are 20 chaplains with the sheriff's department?" "Yes. There are two types of chaplains in the program. One is called an area chaplain, and the other is called cha lain at large. Chaplains at large are not assigned to a

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particular location. Area chaplains are chaplains for a particular station. I'm the area chaplain for Imperial Beach, so I stop by the station for briefings and go on ride-alongs. All chaplains have a blanket ride-along privilege.
