### Gimme Shelter

Why don't homeless people praise God when law enforcement officers give them a printed list of shelters? Stephen Dobyns's report on the Mission Valley Preerve ("They Make Their Home by the River," October 18), oth-erwise thorough and conscien-tious, was, in my opinion, blithe about passing on park rangers' and police's attitude that "there are lots of alternatives"

to being homeless. On the other hand, I applaud Dobyns for noting at length that there are some homeless who "are not of the criminal element," nor are addicts. Although they may be hard to find, nevertheless, with spending the better part of a year researching the article more of them could have been

more of them could have been asked about shelters. Also, there could have been acknowledgment of the upside of having lowlifes hiding out in the bush: e.g., if they use drugs, including alcohol, it's not in your apartment complex at your apartment complex, at your local playground, on you street corner. Now, I don't want addicts and slobs to deprive society at large of the use of any public resource. But the truth is that until now society at large didn't realize is wanted to visit the Mission Valley bush. Now progress is catching up with the Mission Valley bush and its inhabi-tants: addicts, sociopaths, the socially incapable, and the

In fact, there are numerous indignities — as well as inconveniences - to shelter living and guess what, they some times outweigh the indigni-ties of sleeping in the bush or on sidewalks.

on sidewalks.

And that's on top of there not being enough shelter beds to go around. San Diego really has just one general-purpose shelter, St. Vincent de Paul Village, whose capacity for males (other than custodial fathers) is about 200 in this metropolis of 2.5 million (the nation's numof 2.5 million (the nation's num-ber six). Most regular news-paper readers know about the squeeze on shelter beds lo-cally — and the squeezes on flophouse beds locally, and on menial jobs nationally (like for those exhausting their welfare payments). (San Diego Rescue Mission is a detox program for the physically trashed where you put yourself in their hands for at least six months and spend your time in drug coun-seling and Bible study. And of

course it's even smaller than St. Vincent's.) Also, shelters are tempo-

rary — eventually, you must leave. What if you leave, drug rehabilitated even, with little or no income? If you make \$200 to \$900 a month after taxes, should you spend \$350 to \$700 on an overpriced San Diego rental, or should you stay homeless so that you can

# Spam Buster

e all get them and we all hate them: unwanted e-mails advertising cutrate life insurance, low-interest mortgages,

get-rich-quick schemes, debt-consolidation services, ink-jet cartridges, and cellphone accessories. One might live with these annovances, if they weren't accompanied by e-mail bearing live links to websites featuring images of naked Russian teenagers and worse.

"Spam," such e-mail has been dubbed. And when we get it, our first reaction is to blame our Internet-service provider for selling our addresses to the people sending it. leff Dickey, tech-support manager for American Digital Network, an Internet service provider in Kearny Mesa, handles these complaints every day. "So far this morning," he said on a recent Monday, "I've received 250 complaints about spam.

people do what I do here." What he's talking about is combating spam. "I'll spend four hours working on spam on Monday," he says. "But Mondays are my biggest days because I'll have spam from all weekend Tuesday through Friday, I'll do maybe one to two hours a day."

Spamming originated when businesses and private citizens began owning fax machines in the mid-'80s. "You'd get the junk mail by fax." Dickey recalls. " 'Win a free vacation cruise!' People would just spend all day looking for fax numbers and then spamming them with faxes. I first started noticing spam on the computer in

There was a law passed which tells where the mail against fax-machine spam came from and where it's because it wastes the recipients' fax paper and toner. The law that was passed stipulated a \$25-per-instance fine if somebody complains about it. There are no Internet spam laws." In the absence of a law,

Dickey and others like him, who guard the electronicmail gateways of the world, have to come up with their own ways of fighting spam. Their method is blocking; that is, disallowing mail from individuals or whole domains that are known to be sources or channels of unsolicited e-mail "The first thing I do." Dickey explains. "is check out the headers of any mail that comes in." He brings up an e-mail ad for

going. "I start at the bottom and work my way up to the head. Here's my server...and here we see that this one came from a Japanese toy company. So obviously, somebody compromised their server and sent mail through it. So their server is available for anybody on the Internet to use to send mail." That's called an anonymous relay, or open relay. "It's not the toy company it-

self that's sending spam," § server was set up wrong. It allows spammers to send mail through it. See, individual computers don't deliver mail. They send it to an outbound mail server, and

This searching is done with computer programs that automatically send messages to mail servers around the world. "They ask each one to send back a pièce of mail," Dickey explains. "Whatever one they get back, they know that one allows anonymous relays, and then they use that to

send spam " As long as the spammer doesn't flood the Japanese toy company's server with so much mail that their system buckles and their employees can't send mail, the toy company may never know that they are being used as a conduit for electronic junk mail. That is, until Dickey or a colleague receives a spam mail through their server and tells them about it. After he's sent that message, he company's server to his cusCITY LIGHTS

tomers. "I have over 3000 blocked addresses." Dickey says. "Those are addresses that I won't accept mail from because either they're known to accept spam or are an anonymous relay, like the Japanese toy company. Sometimes they call me and say, 'Hey, you're blocking me.' I tell them, 'You were an open relay.' I keep a record of everything I block so I can go back and say, 'Yeah, I blocked you because in 1999. December 7. I received 27 complaints regarding spam from your address Sometimes they say, 'Well, I fixed that problem.' Then I'll test it again, and if it doesn't allow anonymous relay, I'll open it up again."

Most American Internet service providers block anonymous relays. But servers in other countries aren't as careful. "The biggest places to search for relays," Dickey says, "are Korea, Japan, Russia, and China. They're non-Englishspeaking places, but everything [in the computers] is English. They set up their machines, and they either can't read the directions that tell them how to block spam, or they don't care. As long as it works, they don't care. But the thing is, I've seen some servers buckle because of the amount of abuse they've taken. Because if you have a server for maybe 20 or 30 people, your little server works just fine for those 20 or 30 people Then somebody tries to send 250,000 pieces of mail out of it, and the system can't handle it."

Dickey also blocks spam mail by identifying the original source, the spammer himself, though spammers exert great effort not to be identified. They use fake email addresses, though Dickey says his system at American Digital Network can usually spot the phony names, and they sometimes use the e-mail addresses of an unknowing third party as a return path. That's not fun for the third party, Dickey explains. "Because now you're getting 200 complaints about being a spammer," Dickey says, "when you didn't do anything. But they've put your name in there to try to throw us off the track."

work subscribes to several Internet groups that track and keep lists of known spammers. And Dickey keeps his own list. He blocks all of them from sending mail to his customers. He's also had personal e-mail contact with some of the spammers. "One guy," Dickey recalls, "who was local, actually, kept saving, 'I'm not a spammer. It says right on the mail, this is not spam.' I told him if it's unsolicited, it's spam. He just kept saying, 'It's not spam,' so finally I just reported him to his ISP."

Some spammers, upon being blocked or reported, have tried to "mailbomb" Dickey, which means sending "250,000 pieces of mail all saving, 'SCREW YOU!' The idea is to bring my system down. But I'm well-protected against that." Other disgruntled spammers attempt to hack into Dickey's system "to see if they can take it over." He's well-pro-

tected against that too. Another spam-fighting method is to block any email that comes in with a specific subject line. The problem with that is a spammer need only change one character in the subject line to get it through again. Dickey scrolls through a list of such subjects. It's thousands of entries long. The words teens, orgy, wet, and various euphemisms for female anatomy appear over and over, Dickey estimates that porn advertising makes up 30 to 40 percent of the half-million spam e-mails his system blocks every day. As a father of two young daughters, it's that 30 to 40 percent he's most concerned about. Asked what the most offensive spam he'd ever dealt with was, he answers, "We got one from San Francisco," he recalls, "that was somehow gay related. It was pictures of men pooping on meat. I'm not talking about a link here. I'm talking about my customers receiving a piece of mail with pictures right on it of men defecating on steaks."

Kiddie-porn ads also come over the wires. "Those I send to the Federal Trade Commission," Dickey says. "along with multi-level marketing schemes and anything else I think may be

# **Every Knee Shall Bow**

n the phone is Dr. Alex Torres, 43, who has played volleyball on the USA Olympic team, and, years later, returned as team physician at the Atlanta Summer Games. Torres was born and raised in Puetro Rico, took his medical residency at Ohio State, taught at UCSD, and now has a private practice in family and sports medicine that is located on Columbia Street in

San Diego.

"Yes. You'll probably get a lot of knee con-tusions and sprains. You get hit from multiple sides. People will grab your knee."
"Do high school players ever have to have their knees scoped like they do in the pros?"
"Yes. That would be due to an ACL tear

"Yes. That would be due to an ACL tear or meniscus tear. It's very common."

There are so many retired NFL players with severe arthritis in their knees. If you had an 18-year-old football player who has had his right knee sooped and then bruised his knees a couple times, can you say he's going to have arthritis in 30 years?"

Probably, It would increase his chances."

"Do the kids understand that?"

No. They think that they are invincible, that it's never going to happen to them."

"It's a little like smoking; the odds are,

with repeated injuries, football is going to hurt you in the long run." "I completely agree with you. It's a tough sport. I see how hard kids hit each other. It

The word Chaldea takes you back to the very beginning. "You O Lord art the God who chose Abram, who brought him out from Ur of Chaldeans and named him Abraham." Abraham was Chaldean, someone from the land along the middle and lower courses of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers. The story progresses. From Abraham to Moses to Isaac to Jacob. Farther

down the line, the story comes to Jesus of Nazareth. And what was once Chaldea is now Iraq. As 22-year old Rony Odish told me. "Chaldeans have a very, very long history." I met Odish at St.

Peter Chaldean Catholic Church, a large build-ing of white stucco and blue tile that stands stark against footbills in east rn El Cajon. I arrived Sunday's 11:00 a.m. Mass. The nave was already packed. Ushers were putting chairs in the narthex. Many young women with long slender necks, high cheekbones, and large almond-shaped eyes, sat around me. From where I sat I could see the altar and, high on a wall to its right, the painted images of Saint Thomas the Apostle Church's patron) and

Aramaic. Jesus spoke Aramaic, a Semitic language. se to Hebrew, which is also spoken by Chaldeans. This cultural tie to the pre-Islami past is one thing that defined Chaldeans as an ethnic minority in a largely Arab Muslim land Rony Odish told me, "If you went to a Chaldean town in Iraq, the first thing that you'd prob-ably notice is that our women aren't covered. Our family names are different, too. Many of the common ones are Christian, like Thomas, for example, or Michael."

During the Consecration at St. Peter Chaldean Catholic Church, 1 of 15 deacons flanking the altar clashed a pair of brass cymbals.

Another deacon paced before the altar swinging a censer, filling the nave with clouds of smoke that drifted to where I sat in the narthex. smoke that drilled to where I sat in the Instance. Father Michael Bazzi sang and chanted the liturgy in Aramaic. His melodies, sometimes echoed by the deacons, sounded close to those

used in the traditional Jewish liturgy. When it was time to Share the Peace, Father Bazzi was time to Share the Peace, Father Bazzi approached each altar boy and pressed their clasped hands between his palms. In turn, the boys fanned out through the nave, lightly press-ing the clasped hands of parishioners who in turn shared the gesture with the people siting near them.
"The Arabs conquered what we now call Iraq in 636 AD," Odish explained to me. "Before

that, it was a Christian country. For Chaldeans. our faith was very deep. You can see how deep by how long it's survived. We have many mar-tyrs who refused to convert to Islam. Although our liturgical calendar is close to the Roman a 3-day fast that comes 71 days before Easter. This holiday, called Bautha, commemorates two famines we survived through miracles, and it also commemorates a group of young Chaldean girls, novitiates, who in the 8th Century killed themselves rather than convert to Islam. The caliph wanted them for his harem, but they threw themselves into the Euphrat





July 11, 2001, exactly one month from the inute David Edmond Lucitt of Haymarket. Virginia, used his home computer o register online with the Selective Service System, America's draft registration program, he was standing in front of the U.S. Capitol being honored by members of Congress. On June 11, 2001, the 18-year-old home-schooled Eagle Scout became the millionth man to register with the Selective Service via the Internet. The agency inaugurated the online registration program in December 1998, and the number of men choosing to register by computer has grown steadily since.

Hosted by Selective Service director Alfred Rascon, Lucitt had a morning meeting at the Pentagon with General Henry Shelton, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. In the afternoon at the U.S. Capitol, Lucitt was honored by Virginia senator John Warner and Virginia representative Frank Wolf. He received a commemorative plaque from director Rascon and signed a large version of his registration acknowledgment card, measuring two by five feet. The card is ordinarily small enough to fit in a wallet. Lucitt plans to attend college beginning in fall 2002.

Like thousands of young men every day, Lucitt simply logged on to the Selective Service website (www.sss.gov), keyed in some basic information, and instantly received his Selective Service registration number. Men can also register at any local post office by completing a registration card, or they may fill out and return a card they get in the mail. Federal law requires virtually all men to register with the Selective Service within 30 days of turning 18. All U.S. male citizens, no matter where they reside, as well as male nonci-



tizens residing in the U.S., are required to register. Although late registrations are accepted, a man cannot register once he reaches age 26. Moreover, Selective Service registration is linked to many benefits, such as eligibility for federal student loans and grants, training programs under the Workforce Investment Act, federal jobs in the executive branch of the U.S. government, and jobs with the U.S. Postal Service More than half of the states have enacted legislation that links benefits such as state tuition assistance and eligibility for state jobs to registration. Eleven states have enacted legislation connecting Selective Service registration with a man's application for a driver's license. Additionally, male immigrants who are in the U.S. when they are 18 through 25 years old may be denied U.S. citizenship if they fail to register.

The last draft ended in 1973, after massive protests against the system for sending men to Vietnam. The current pseudo-draft is the only surviving element of President Jimmy Carter's

election-year response to the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan in 1980. Altculture (www.altculture.com), the guide to Gen-X plaints of the '90s, points out that Carter's other moves that year. the grain embargo and Olympic boycott, have been consigned to a terrible purgatory — answers to leopardy questions. work. If and when Congress

and the President reinstate a military draft, the Selective Service System would conduct a national lottery to determine the order in which young men would be drafted. The lottery would establish the priority of call based on the birth dates of registrants. The first men drafted would be those turning age 20 during the calendar year of the lottery. For example, if a draft were held in 2002, those men born in 1982 would be considered first. If a young man turns 21 in the year of the draft, he would be in the second priority, in turning 22 he would be in the third priority, and so forth until the year in which he turns 26. at which time he is over the age of liability. Men under 20 would not be called in that year until men in the 20-to-25 age group are called. "Because of the enor mous impact of this lot tery," the site explains, "it would be conducted publicly, with full coverage by the media. Accredited observers from public-interest groups will have full access to observe the proceedings."

The site's FAQ page is also especially thorough. For example: "If I am religiously or morally opposed o participating in war, must I still register?" The answer is yes, but conscientious objectors can opt for nonmilitary service. The agency also answers this question: "How does the Military Selective Service Act apply to individuals who have had a sex change?" Individuals who are born female and have a sex change are not required to register, the site explains. U.S. citizens or immigrants who are born male and have a sex change are still required to regist though in the event of a resumption of the draft. males who have had a sex change can file a claim for exemption from military service.

They say that if a soufflé falls or if it's eaten lukewarm, it still tastes the same. Don't believe them. "Soufflé" means "puffed up," but it comes from a French word that also means breath or breathing. The point of a soufflé is the warm fragrant air it exhales when you first break it open. Your big spoon pokes through the brown crunchy dome, steam rushes up to your nose. This While I wait to see if my soufflé rises warm sigh carries the essence of whatever you've put into your soufflé - cheese, nutmeg, mushrooms, or garlic. The first few bites should be light and hot and almost frothy.

I don't remember the first time I planted a seed or the first time I made a soufflé, Those first tries were likely failures. A soufflé takes 35 minutes to cook. as Thomas Barker but we called him Pappy - had only one child: my mother. He died in her home in Cortland, New York, on Septem ber 24, 1994. He was 85. After the funeral. Grandpa (my father's father) told his wife, "I want to go like Tom Barker did." Pap's was a beautiful death - at home. in relative comfort, surrounded by family and at peace with his God.

-When Pappy went, he went quickly though he had been on a gradual slide for some time. Tuberculosis had left him with only one lung many years previously, and by the time he moved into our home in upstate New York after the death of his wife Mary in 1989, he had become a largely sedentary fellow. Most days he spent sitting in our back room. After reciting the prayers of the Rosary, he read the Daily News and the New York Post, and often part of a detective novel by Tony Hillerman or Dick Francis. He noted the weather (and other significant events) in his diary and watched the seasons' effects on Mom's backyard garden through the enormous plate-glass window. Evenings, he ate dinner with us before retiring to the living room to watch television. Summers, he took us on vacation, as he had done since forever.

Mom tried to get him to exercise. Most days, she brought him up to the local college for walks. She also engaged a physical therapist, who later noted in a thank-you card for the bequest he left her, "Sometimes I think there were more days of laughing together than exercising." Pap, a gregarious ex-political man with a love for clever nonsense, had a gift for casually chatting his way out of odious propositions such as moving about, and so it was no big surprise that the muscle mass in his legs continued to deteriorate. His lung also grew gradually weaker. And I wonder whether Mom didn't push him as hard as she might have - he had lived a long time, he was the family patriarch; surely he had some right to avoid certain unpleasantries?

In the summer of 1994, he began to take oxygen, trailing the slender tub ing along behind him as he ambled through the house. I'm sure he hated the indignity of the tube snaking out of his

Later, Grandma asked Dad the same question This time Cheryl answered for him: "Tommy doesn't want to see him. He said Daddy's in heaven now.

Dad replied softly, "No. I didn't say that. Only God knows where a soul is after the person dies." Cheryl looked down. Grandma tried to lighten things up. "Well, he might be in Purgatory!"

Dad wanted to make a pilgrimage the morning after the funeral to Syracuse: the rest of us were not so eager. "God's time is not our time," I joked, trying to lessen the urgency. As it happened, remembers Dad a close friend of the family had "some addi-tional indulgences from her time in the Holy Land that she had not applied. and she said, 'I'll apply one to your father's soul.' "Nor do we," said my father. "Nor do we." . - Matthew Lickon



I opposed our involvement in Vietnam and took part in numerous antiwar der ions. The war created a terr in the 1960s. My solution was to enlist in the U.S. Army med ical corps. I was trained in combat medicine and served for two years at Brooke Army Medical Center at Ft. Sar cared for were so severely in jured that we received them within 48 hours from halfwar around the world — if the survived that long. Many o them had either stepped on mines or been injured in na-palm and bomb attacks. I still believe I made the correct decision. I served my country

without compromising my op-position to personal violence. position to personal violence. While the parameters of the present conflict are different, our country's military thinking has progressed very little since that time. Since September 11, I have spent quite a bit of time listening to talk radio (since I don't watch TV) in order to keep up with events. Many rvatives are ridiculing and vilifying today's pead movement, just as they did during Vietnam. Unfortu nately, the young people whose comments you sought out play right into their hands. Their wardice, selfishness, and lack of patriotism are exactly wha these commentators rightly de-spise. Moreover, they display the shallowness and moral decay which Islamic extremist

are telling their people char-acterize American culture. I have had a number of Muslim friends. Middle Faster are deeply emotional and ex travagantly generous people. The shouting and gesticulating which we Westerners find so which we Westerners find so disturbing are their traditional way of expressing themselves. ### A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond • By Jerry Schad After about 100 yards, pass a

Millard Camyon's happily splashing stream, presided over by oaks, adders, maples, and bigone boughas firs, flows out of the San Gabriel Mountains and down into the urban flatands of the Los Anglete Basin. The six-mile looping hike into and through this caryon (as described here) reveals plenty of natural beauty, and you can also snoop around the side of the Dawn Mine. a small time. around the site of the Dawn Mine, a small gold mine worked intermittently from 1895 until the early 1950s.
From Loma Alta Drive in the city of

Altadena, drive up the Chaney Trail (a paved road) to the top of Sunset Ridge, where there's parking by the roadside. Walk east on the gated, paved Sunset Ridge fire road.



After about 1,00 yards, pass a foot trail on the left leading down to Millard Campground. Continue another 300 yards to a second foot trail on the left (Sunset Ridge Trail). Take it. On it you contour north and east along Millard Carryon's south wall, passing above the 50-foot-high falls. You begin climbling in earnest at about climbing in earnest at about 0.9 mile and soon reach a trail fork. The left branch (your return route) goes down 100 yards past a private cabin to the canyon bottom. You go right, uphill. Switchbacks long

and short take you farther up along the the abandoned Dawn Mine, perched on the pleasantly shaded canyon wall to an inter-section with Sunset Ridge fire road (2.4 miles), just below a rocky knob called Cape Turn left on the fire road, and walk

## **His First 81 Years**

It has been customary to say that Stern played from the heart.

age of 81 filled me with a deep sense of loss. In my own lifetime, I have heard more performances by Stern than by any other violin-ist. His playing introduced me to much of the repertoire. His style shaped my perceptions of other performers on his instra

other performers on his instru-ment. Listening to him taught me about the meaning of musical ex-pression. And in all of this, I was

From the very first, Stern established himself as one of the world's great violinists. He belonged in the select company that included Heifetz, Mil-stein, David Oistrakh, Oscar Shumsky, Aaron Rosand.... This was violin playing of the Russian school — indeed, of the Odessa school (Stern himself was Ukrainian born, although he was rought up and trained in San Francisco and wa altogether an American). Already at the beginning of his career, in the 1930s, he exhibited to the full the characteristic Russian traits: the rich, vibran tone, the emotional intensity, the dazzling virtu-osity, the delight in sheer fiddling. If you want to hear Stern in this mode, there is probably no bet ter demonstration of his abilities than the CT that includes Sarasate's Zigeunerweisen, Was man's Carmen-Fantasie, Saint-Saëns' Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso, Chausson's Poème, and Ravel's Tzigane. He could play The Flight of the Bumblebee in as sizzling a fashion as anybody

His brilliant technical command lasted well ver 50 years. In his last decade, there was - in termittently but discernibly — a certain weakening. The blooming tone was sometimes weakening. The biodining tone was sometimes thinned; the fiery energy was a bit less heated; in-tonation was no longer dead center. An occasional concert (such as the one he gave here at the Civic Theater in 1992) left the audience in a state of pained dissatisfaction, for they had expected the tern they knew of old. ary to say that Stern played from the heart: that the authenticity and communicability of his feelings were his defining characteristics. Such a formulation doesn't quite capture the essence of his playing. Yes, music expresses and evokes emo-tion, but there is more to a great performance than that. Musical phrases have a shape that com municates meaning: they expand or contract, they reiterate or reconsider, they question or an-swer, they assert or explore or insinuate, they articulate a discourse of ideas, constantly on the move, that shapes the listener's experience in a way far more comprehensive than the expression of feelings. Musical emotion for its own sake be comes tiresome. In performances by really great musicians, the feelings are expressed in the con-text of this movement of thought and thereby acquire their power to affect us over the entire course of a composition.

Here was the aspect of performance in which Stern was supreme. He reminded me of Maria Callas, whose uniqueness lay not in her emotionalism but in the way she could mold every phrase into the ideal vehicle for conveying a spe cific dramatic situation. Callas, being an oper singer, had the advantage of words and of char acter and action, while Stern did not. But he was a master of all the things a violin can do, man of which are equivalent to a singer's devices: the stretching and condensing of rhythm, the swell within a tone, the change of color (produced on the violin by changes in bow speed and pressure and by exploiting the diverse qualities of the four strings), the variations of vibrato, the differen



Meaning sometimes turns on an excruciating hyper-awareness of art history (not to be confused with erudition) Vic Muniz's Milan (The Last Supper) is a large, spooky pho tograph of a copy of Leonardo fresco that Muniz made with chocolate syrup. After taking the picture, the artist licked the image away, an action we're supposed to consider part of the work Question: Where would we be if wall labels didn't decree the artist's intent? An swer. The work might take on an uncontrolled life of its own or drop dead on the spot. The wall label instructs us that Muniz's photograph "is more than just a record of the artist's ephemeral art making, but rather, a key part of the illusion." This sort of burled self-consciousness can kill the actual importance of having a sense of the past. Vernon Fisher's Faya (an African place

# **Fifty Feet from** a Beatle

I stood there...singing "I'm a Loser" in my head.

then I was 20, I attended a Beatles convention. These are similar to Star Trek working to the st

around to sign, it was a good investment. Especially after I have the other three Beatles autograph it. He laughed, saying, "The closest you'll ever get to a Beatle are the cockroaches in your apartment." Years later, when I got a job at a radio station,

Tears later, when I got a job at a radio station, lwas getting closer to my goal. I had interviewed loe Walsh. His manager Smokey set me up with backstage passes when Ringo Starr played at Camp Pendleton — with Walsh on guitar. I was backstage in a "VIP tent," but I couldn't

get to another area where Ringo was. I was stand-ing around with Joe Walsh and Nils Lofgren, but Ringo was behind another chain-link fence. So Walsh walked with me to the fence, and we handed it to a security guy, who walked over to Ringo, who then signed it. The security guy then brought it back, and I thanked him. Ringo didn't even look up at us. Joe Walsh did think the idea of having the Beatles sign it would be really cool and was to-tally into helping me out. It was only a matter of months before I got my next Beatle autograph.

George Harrison was doing a Rockline inter-view in Los Angeles, but I was told by Harrison's people that he wouldn't be doing autographs or photos. I sent my record anyway. A lady who worked for Rockline knew the promotion direc tor at our station, and she said if I sent her the for at our station, and she said if I sent her the record, she'd try to get it signed. She sent it back signed and told me Harrison was signing lots of stuff for people and was really nice.

Paul McCartney was last on the list. It was a year later, and he went out on tour. He wasn't coming to San Diego, so I went to the show in Los Angeles. Through the radio station, I got a hold of his tour manager. She told me to meet her at a

certain spot before the concert. My friends and I had already purchased the tickets, so it didn't sound bad asking her this favor. It wasn't like I was some weasely radio guy hitting her up for free tickets and an autograph from McCartney. Well, she never showed up at the ren-

dezvous point. As my friends went to their seats, I stayed, in case the JOSHUA BOARD tour manager was running late. I stood there most of the concert,

holding my record, singing "I'm a Loser" in my

head.

A few months later, when McCartney was playing in Cincinnati, a radio station we had been exchanging morning show ideas with told us Paul was coming into the station for an interview. He was coming into the station for an interview. He said ticket sales had been poor for the show. I asked if I could send my record over for a signa-ture, and he said sure. But I started thinking it over. I really didn't know this guy. He did seem a little eager to do this for me. What if somebody at their station stole it? Or if he says it got lost in the mail? A number of things could happen, and besides, there would be hundreds of employees. besides, there would be hundress of employees, fans, and others waiting for autographs. I decided against sending the record, thinking another op-portunity would surely present itself. Five years passed, and things started looking worse. I lost my job at the radio station. Linda

McCartney died, and Paul wasn't making music. I got so desperate to add a fourth signature to my Beatles album that I had Pete Best sign it. Hopefully that won't lower the value.

I read about DJ Jerry G. Bishop of KPOP hav-ing traveled with the Beatles in the mid-'60s. I called his voice mail to ask if he could help in my quest to get that last autograph. He left a message on my machine telling me he couldn't and that he was getting lots of calls like mine. But Tommy Sablan, the producer of *Jeff & Jer*, didn't even return my call. A friend had told me Sablan was going on and on about having his guitar signed by McCartney.

In May of this year, I heard McCartney was

hosting a dinner in June to raise money for Adopt a-Minefield. This is a charity he and his girlfriend

hen Chester Burnett, a.k.a. Howlin' Wolf, first walked into Sam Phillips's tiny Memphis Recording Service studio in May of 1951, he made quite an impression on

the 28-year-old producer, who in only a few more years would be running the leg-endary Sun Records label a label that introduced Elvis. et al. But at this point Phillips was only a stringer in Mem-phis, a talent scout for the Los phis, a talent scout for the Los Angeles-based Bihari broth-ers, who were marketing black music on their RPM/Modern label.

The Wolf was 6'6," with 16-inch feet that stuck out

the back of his shoes so as not to further torment his aching corns ("Big Foot Chester" was one of his nicknames). And he was wearing coveralls, having come directly from his farmwork. He sat down, planted those giant feet wide apart, and be-gan wailing on his French harp (harmonica); his

eyes lit up, and the veins on the back of his neck were about to pop. He sang in that tortured, gravelly voice he'd picked up from Charlie Patton, like a man possessed. When his band turned up, Wolf launched into a song, and

the three instrumentalists tried to follow as best they

Wolf's contract was eventually picked up by Chess Records, up in Chicago, the company that produced Muddy Waters, among others. A few weeks before Christmas in 1952, Wolf gave up his ioh as DI at KWEM in west Memphis, tur

the farm he'd inherited from his grandfather to his brother, bought a Cadillac, took all of his money out of the bank, and drove off to' Chicago. Throughout his career, Wolf was to boast that only

he, among the dozens who headed north from the Delta to break into the Chicago

scene, left in style.

It was cold as hell in Chicago, and Wolf's feet hurt all the time because he had to keep them inside shoes, pre sumably no set of which was ample enough to accommo-date "Big Foot." Upon his arrival, he discovered that Muddy Waters ruled the Chicago electric blues scene

commanded the best gigs and sidemen, and coveted his title as King of the Blues. Nowadays, B.B. King claims that spot, but Muddy and the Wolf never took B.B. too seriously, B.B. was slick, playing for a better

class of folks. What some call a shin kind of blues. Muddy and the Wolf played deep-bottom, amplified Delta blues, and the two REVIEW were to become natu-sometimes fierce — competitors

It was Muddy Waters who helped get Wolf his first live gig in Chicago in the early days of 1953, but he wouldn't make that mistake twice. Muddy was a great performer, but Wolf was off the charts groaning, rolling around on the floor, experienc-ing a cross between an epileptic seizure and sexual

convulsions. He had an enormous voice, to match his height and girth, but was remarkably light on his feet for a man his size. He had a raw, powerful band behind him, with Willie and 'Struction wailband behind him, with Willie and 'Struction wailing away for all they were worth. Over time these two would give way for smoother, more accomplished players, such as guitarist Hubert Sumlin and Otis Spann, formerly of the Muddy Waters band. Throughout the '50s, Muddy and the Wolf would spirit to the work of the work

away each other's star players. The Wolf had a nasty habit of slapping his musi-cians when they messed up, and that would have been a big slap. His guitarist Willie Johnson was always a problem drinker and didn't especially like being slapped. Johnson apparently slashed Wolf with a razor on at least one occasion. And Wolf more than once received reprimands from the Musicians Union. These were hard-living country people in the big city. They were rough-and-ready and knew plenty about razors and shivs and not ever ever backing off. It's easy enough to find all that

the lyrics.

Robert Palmer, the excellent writer, producer, and great friend of the blues, says of the two Chicago rivals, "Muddy was superstud, the Hoochie Coochie Man; Wolf was the feral beast." Palmer quotes a

blues saxophonist, Eddie Shaw, who left the Delta with the Muddy Waters with the Muddy Waters band in 1957 and the next year joined the Wolf out-fit. "Muddy never had the energy Wolf had, not even at his peak. Muddy would rock the house pretty good, but Wolf was the most exciting blues player I've ever seen." Palmer himself writes: "No matter how hard he worked

# North County Roundup, Part II

Good mo-o-o-rning, Encinitas! Up north, it's early to bed and hungry to rise. On a Saturday midnight, traffic's down to one SUV or two motorcycles very 30 seconds. By 1:00 a.m., the Coast High way is a film noir blacktop, all fog and emptiness, waiting for Cloris Leachman to show up in a trench coat and run scared down the centerline. Come morning, through same spooky fog, you can spot ravenous creatures hunting for...omelets. Encinitas loves a good breakfast, and Old Highway 101 has the cafés to prove it.

The more ornate members of the species inhabit the area south of Encinitas Boulevard the dividing line between the North Coast and South Coast Highway, ground zero for street addresses along Old 101. (To the north is the community of Leucadia, with ascending North Coast Highway street numbers, and to the south is "downtown Encinitas, with ascending South Coast Highway street numbers.) Just south of the great divide, the train tracks along the highway veer slightly east, allowing room on the Coast Highway for a low rise shopping district about half a mile long. The defining structure there is the Lumberyard, a rus-tic rendering of a strip mall. In, around, and opposite it is a concentration of restaurants that nearly rivals the Gaslamp's.

There are probably a dozen dedicated breakfast-lunch specialists, ranging from plain American-style diners to bistros with a touch of 'tude. Interestingly between the surfers at Swami's and the Self Realization Fellowship at the south end of town, nearly every eatery offers several health-conscious and/or vegetarian choices as well as the expected cholesterol-orgie

### When The Saints Come Marching In

The three most popular breakfast destination ire all near the south end of the Lumberyard. Each caters to a different morning palate — one light, one medium, and one gargantuan.

If you prefer a "continental breakfast," St

Tropez Bakery and Bistro is made to order for you Lumbervard, 947 South Coast Highway #103D. Encinitas, 760-633-0084; 7:00 a.m.-7:30 p.m. daily). The display case sports a gorgeous array of house baked pastries, including two versions of the rare. clusive pastries, including two versions of the rare, clusive brioche (if you get there before they're all gone) and four varieties of coffee, including a seriously good French roast. When you order items that require cooking or assembling, you're given a num-

bered placard that you place on your table of choice. be it indoors in the simple, sunny dining room or out on the terrace. A waiter will bring your food to your table and recycle the number. Eating alone? There's a pile of today's newspapers right by the front door. Although St. Tropez does serve the usual

American egg-and-omelet variations, their Frenchtinged brunchy dishes lend more amusing breaks om routine: They'll cook you a croque mo or croque madame (grilled ham and cheese sandwiches, topped with

either light cream sauce or an egg), crèpes or a quiche with a choice of fillings, French onion soup gratiné

(a great eye-opener on a foggy dawn), or a chicken filled vol-au-vent puff-pastry shell. Some cosmopolitan lunch choices are Pan Bagnat, basically a tuna salade niçoise on a baguette, an elaborate goat cheese salad, and several hot panini (Mediterranean-style grilled sandwiches), including "Nice" ranean-style griled sandwiches), including "Nice (prosciutto, mozzarella, and cornichons) and "Mar-seilles" (vegetarian ratatouille and Swiss cheese). Entrées run \$6.25 to \$9.50. The bakery's desserts range from cookies on up to full-size elaborate

deadline, we actually got up in time for breakfast well before the fig burned off and the hungry hordes arrived. Between the chill mist and a nearby noisy leaf-blower, we had to forgo the street patio in favor of the cony interior, with its handsome, resin-coated tree-trunk tables and booths. One of those pancakes defeated me swiftly, with pancakes, I decided, smaller is better. All the egg dishes and sandwiches come with the Shack's famous house postatoes—a simple skiller-fry that comes to life with a dash of salt and a heaping spoonful of the flavorful house salsa. Want more? Just ask; it's all-wouse.an-eat at no extra chares ('Our neighbors). you-can-eat at no extra charge. (Our neighbor devoured two heaping extra portions — enough for a family dinner casserole.) Other specialties for a family dinner casserole.) Other specialties include hand-cut french fries (plain, "ranch," or "Cajum"); baked potatoes with a wealth of stuffings; potato patties (a.k.a. latkes) — plus biscuits and sausage gravy and beer-battered onion rings made from sweet reds. Lunches offer a wide selection of "deli" sandwiches, cold and hot, and a hearty bow of chili con carne. Prices range from \$3 to \$8.40. Make sure to check out the potato-themed cartoon mura

#### International Lunches

Bubbie's (Lumberyard, 937 South Coast Highway #106, Encinitas; 11:00 a.m.—8:00 p.m. daily) does only a few things (sandwiches, gelati, and sorbet) but does them exceedingly well. The "gournet sandwiches' really do live up to their designation, with intrigu-ing combinations on soft, round Italian bread. ing combinations on soft, round trauan oread. I was quite taken with a "French Riviera," featuring tuna, artichoke hearts, black olives, tomato, and mild onion shreds with a touch of oregano. "Italian vegetables" substitutes grilled eggplant for fish in the same array, and the eggplant can also pair up with gorgonzola or smoked gouda. (Or you can just get a tuna salad or tuna melt if that's your flavor.) Prices (\$4-\$5, or \$3.05 for a still-substantial "mini") are well under average for this corner of town. The gelati are about twice as rich as Häagen-Dazs, as thickly gooey as melted pizza-cheese, and feature a mutable array of bold flavors — vanilla rosewater

#### Kim's Restaurant

Although there are three Japanese restaurants on or near the South Coast Highway, other types of Asian food are scanty in this neigh borhood. Kim's Restaurant (Lumberyard, 745 South Coast Highway #J103, Encinitas, 760-942-4816) offers two of them, Vietnamese and Chinese (It's despite centuries of tension, they've shared plenty of people and recipes.) In this simple room, the atmosphere is calm, and the service is quick and pleasant. The menu lists 265 items, including 18 Vietnamese house specialties, 28 seafood dishes, and a whopping 45 vegetarian/vegan dishes, many made with seitan (mock poultry). As you'd expect with so ambitious a menu, the seafood isn't necessarily fresh catch much of the shellfish is evidently obtained frozen, the scallops are phosphate-preserved, and sevchewy, rehydrated dried abalone imported from the South China Sea. Portions are enormous, and Kim's cooking is careful and tasty, although some flavors have appar-ently been adapted to American tastes and ingredients.

One style of "foreign food" that Encinitas has been lacking lately is modern French regional cui-sine. (There are two French restaurants east of the freeway, but they cleave to the weighty sauce-rich classics ) The brand new Bistro Soleil (641 South Coast Highway, 760-942-9549), whose owner hails from Biar ritz, fills the bill with a menu of Provençal specialties. Light, herbal preparations emphasize seafood and feature olive products instead of cream and butter. Flavors are clean and natural. At our visit, the construction zone for the rebuilding of this stretch of the highway had landed smack in front of the bistro, but what's a short stroll through the sand to get a good dinner? Like the side-walk just outside, the menu, too,

visit to sample the new dishes. Currently, with the street torn up, the restaurant is open for dir ner only, Mondays through Saturdays; lunch service will resume when the sidewalk returns

Vigilucci's (505 South Coast Highway, Encinitas, 760-942-7332; open daily, lunch and dinner) is one of the most popular restau-rants in Encinitas, Land of 10,000 Trattorias - and for once, I agree with the masses. Looking the the front window at the roman-tically lighted dining room, you see patrons addressing hills of salad, attacking mountains of pasta, raising their wine glasses, laughing and chatting and clearly enjoying the moment. The restau rant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. The maitre d' is eye candy, the waiters are bouncy and jokey, lifting everyone's spirits — and, speak-ing of spirits, the pages-long mainly Italian wine list boasts such modest markups at its lowe end, everybody can afford a lit tle vino with dinner

seafood and veal, but what proves

pastas and the well-treated sea sonal vegetables. We began with a trio of bruschetti, with toppings of chopped fresh tomatoes with use-roasted marinated diced bell peppers, and black-olive spread, The peppers were olive spread, The peppers were firm-tender, not over-roasted exquisitely seasoned, while th tomatoes were sweet and juicy-ripe over a thin slick of Parmesan (The olive paste was just so-so.) Then we shared a pasta three-some called "Festa Italiana," which splashed the Italian flag onto the plate: There was the red of a fine. simple marinara sauce dressing delicate mozzarella-stuffed tortellini. There was the white of the besciamella over a large, tender cannelloni stuffed with a deeply flavorful, meaty mince of stewed veal and dark-meat chicken (not the typical pre-ground meat oli. Finally, our pair of entrées each came with different vegeta bles — big, fresh, barely cooked hunks of broccoli and cauliflower accompanied by a juicy, tart sauced "special" of swordfish piccata, while on the tangy veal saltimbocca, the cauliflower trysted with long, thin slices of green and with long, thin sices of green and yellow squashes and a single thick, soulful round of full-grown car-rot. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning — that's Italian. Did I mention it's crowded? Better reserve, especially for weekend dinners, or you'll spend an hour listening to Puccini out on the sidewalk with your nose pressed to the glass. (Pastas \$9-\$13, entrée

St. Germain's Café (1010 South Coast Highway, Encinitas, 760-753-5411; 7:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. daily) offers its own cute, sheltered patio with full service, as well as a surprisingly large interior din-ing room, which includes a separate smoothie and ice cream bar. Despite the Parisian-sounding name the grub is California-American. Omelets are the cafe's

best-known dish — 14 variations of three-eggers (or Egg Beaters by request), served with toast or a muffin, plus tasty herbstrewn "café potatoes" or fresh frui NAOMI WISE salad. But don't overlook the Bel-

gian waffles, scrambles, pancakes iges, or the three versions of expertly poached eggs Benedict with genuine hollandaise Sandwiches here are hearty American classics (in-th-d ing some veg choices), and along with burgers (beef, turkey, veggie) there are six twists on lean char-broiled chicken breast on a burger bun. Entrées are \$3.50 to \$7.50.

And in between, rope and black metal lights, bare varnished wood booths, white arches at the counter, hished wood doonly, white arches at the counter, lime-green wall behind, and the red glow from the bar. I sit down. An alcove table full of black-chad guys and gals fills up. They have, like, bits of metal coming out of all kinds of soft tissue. One metal coming out of all kinds of soft tissue. One guy with a Che Guevara face has two silver fangs pierced down through his upper lips. Ouch. And one coming up through his lower. But their faces are intelligent, open. Conversation whips back

and forth in English and Spanish. Tall guy brings a pitcher of beer. Plates of Mexican food follow. Prijoles, rice, salads, stuffed chiles, the usual Mex-

ttoos on her front and arms brings ttoos on her front and arms brings me a basket of tortilla chips, a bowl of salsa, and the menu. Guadalupe. She somehow makes tattooing look hip. I order a coffee (85 cents, includes refills) while I figure out FORK

The food is mostly vegetarian. But under "Los Entrées de la Casa," you've got meaty things like chicken or steak ranchero with sautéed mush-

rooms, onions, bell peppers, and tomatoes (\$6.25). rooms, onions, bell perpers, and tonatoes (\$6.25). Single most texpensive item is \$7.25. Fajitas— sautéed chcken, stek, or tofu with the same veg-gies and tortillas. I wonder about chile relleno (\$3.50), chimichangas (\$4.75); flastus (\$5.25), and nachos with carne asada or pollo asado (\$5.95). Then there's \$6.00 salads, \$3.75 enchi-lada choices (the tofu with mushrooms looks pretty interesting), quesadillas (from \$1.25 for the corn to \$4.75 for the carne asada), tacos (\$2.50-\$2.75), burritos (\$3.00-\$4.50), tortas (mostly \$4.00), and tostadas (\$2.25-3.00). I almost stop at number 13 of the 14 combo plates (\$7.00): it's called "You don't want it!" But my eye catches "Tom's Deep Plate: beans, rice, sour cream, guacamole, salsa fresca, and four corn or flour tortillas, \$4.75."

"I'll have that," I say.



ast week, I opined that a certain amount of skepticism about natural-yeast fermenta-mitions—those conducted by whatever yeasts happen to make it into a tank of juice, as opposed to those conducted by a specific added yeast— was 'understandable.' This was be-

cause I shared in that skepticism Rooting around in my memory for the source of my aversion, I came across a line - I seem to remember that it was from a winemaker visiting San Diego from up north— that said something to the effect of,

"When people talk about wild yeasts, what they really mean are the yeasts that are growing inside their winery facility. They may think that a particular wine has been fermented by wild yeasts, but in reality, they're the same yeasts as they use when they make commercially inoculated wines. They've just been growing in the building instead of a lab." "Wild yeasts" was really just another term r "poor sanitation

I think I tended to believe that statement be cause it sounded like the humorous deflating of a hype-filled balloon floating down from Northa type-lineu bandon noating down from North-ern California wine country. The man who said it seemed to know his business and was from a winery that didn't need to puff itself up by taking potshots at others. It sounded like the inside e. Later, when I heard that UC Davis had concluded much the same thing, my suspicions hardened into belief.

Paul Draper, winemaker and CEO at Ridge
Vineyards, also heard the Davis reports. "[They]
were saying that there was so little yeast in the vineyards that it couldn't possibly be responsible for the fermentations, and so, obviously, [the culprit was dirty equipment in the winery. Somehow, the yeasts were over-wintering in the winery, just sitting around waiting for new grapes to come in." Draper, who had always practiced natural-yeast

fermentations as a matter of both principle and

grapes off-site, crush them, and see nentation started. We did it about if natural ferr three years in a row, and every time, natural fer mentation started within 36 to 48 hours. That said to us that the yeasts were in the vineyard."

Next, "We did our best to sterilize the equip-

ment — we washed down our receiving hopper, our crusher, our must pump, our must lines and our tank. We sterilized with sulfur dioxide and then neutralized with citric acid. We then went through the equipment, scraping crevices. We plated up the scrapings and we got some molds, but we couldn't get any yeast. So, we figured we had done a damn good job of sterilizing the equipment. We then crushed grapes through the equipment and into the tank, and fermentation started within 48 hours. At the end of the day, we washed the equipment with water. Three days later, we scraped the crevices again and found them loaded with yeast. The

equipment had been inoculated from the vineyard." How, then, to explain the Davis findings? "Davis had said, 'If you go and take a sample in a vineyard, there are a lot of clusters on which there are no veasts, and only one berry in a thousand has yeasts yeases, and only one cerry in a mousand nas yease on it." "Draper refers to the work of Robert Mor-timer, a UC Berkeley professor emeritus of yeast genetics. "He found that if there were any broken berries in a vineyard — if a bird pecked a berry, or

"We looked at it empirically. We had a Ph.D. in mi-crobiology who had done his thesis on indigenous yeast working full-time for us." Draper and his

First, "We had him go out in the vineyard and do a real cross-sampling of the vineyard— a hundred-berry sample or some-thing—with sterile scissors, sterile edgress sterile bags the whole thine? gloves, sterile bag, the whole thing." Draper then had him "take the

if a cane on a vine hit some berries and damaged one or two, or if a piece of equipment came through, or somebody suckering or leaf-pulling or drop-ping fruit brushed against a cluster enough to break the skin — then that berry was loaded with literally millions of yeasts within a short time.

"What they found was that the yeasts were ar-riving on the legs of insects, particularly bees, who were coming to the berry once it was broken to get sugar from it. They began to examine the beehives — those were the easiest — and they found the yeast in the beehive. I think the idea was that the yeast can over-winter in the beehive be cause of the sugar that is in the honey. What [Davis] failed to find is that one berry in a thou-sand has so many millions of yeasts on it that it's easily able to ferment the other thousand berries."

And what are the bees bringing? "The way I taste, personally," says Draper, "has more to do with structure and mouth-feel than with fruit and spice. I note those things, but I'm nowhere near as accurate as some of my colleagues here are hear as accurate as some of my colleagues nere are.

My feeling is [that natural yeasts give] greater
richness, greater complexity. I'm speaking of texture, because that's what interests me — a fuller texture, a more complex layering of flavors in the mouth and in the nose." One of those sharp-

tongued colleagues, vice president of winemak ing Eric Baugher, says that "with the inoculated yeast, you can get intense fruit, but rather simple and straightforward — of the varietal. What you can get with the natural yeast is far more complex — different fruits, higher volatile acid, higher alcohol...nuances you're not seeing in the more straightforward single yeast fermentation."

According to Baugher, you also get variation fermentation to fermentation, which can yield a more complex finished product. "With barrel-fer-mented Chardonnay, each barrel is its own separate vat. We definitely see a lot of diversity" barrel to barrel. "[They] may have started with the same juice, but whatever yeast was in there that carried out the fermentation may be unique. One barrel may be particularly diffusive, with pineapple and may be particularly diffusive, with pineappie and tropical elements, while the next one may be crisper, [with] more apple and more defined Chardonnay fruit. We're starting off with the same juice; it's being barreled down the same day." The only vari able is the yeast. And even if different batches are carrying similar yeasts, the juice "is going into a mix of different barrels, some of which have been used in previous years. Those, of course, have a different yeast sitting in them, latent, which then reacts to the juice that's put in there."

Rife initially earned respect in the medical community for his invention of a powerful microscope in the early '30s. Using that microscope, he managed to isolate cancer cells. He subsequently identified a radio frequency or light frequency that could destroy only the cancer cells, while he watched through the microscope.

Rife's research into "energy medicine" was allegedly sandbagged by a doctor who was head of the American Medical Association. That

doctor was said to be aligned with drug manufacturers. San Diego medical officials forbid practitioners from using Rife's instruments. A New Jersey laboratory, where Rife's discoveries were being confirmed, caught fire. Papers of USC's Special Medical Research Committee vanished. Rumors flew that scientists and doctors had been paid to hush.

In the mid '50s, Rife pleaded his case at

hearings and asked that he be allowed to

resume use of his instruments. The state of

California denied him. Rife died in 1971.



When asked by friends who are planning to marry what sorts of items they should list or their registry, I reply without hesitation, "Get good knives and pots." Good, sharp knives are the engine of my kitchen — they make everything else go. But now, they had become dull

I had held off getting them sharpened for some time, out of trepidation. I had had my knives sharpened two years ago, and two of them came back marred. The sides of the chef's knife and tical scratches, and the blade of the chef's knife showed two tiny nicks where none had been before. The knives were sharp, all right, but their faces had been pocked, and those nicks made me uneasy. I didn't like the thought of anything less than a smooth, clean cut while I was slicing away. But now, regardless of past unpleas-antries, I knew I had to put my blade to the grindstone and get it done.
The store I had taken the knives to

did advertise as a knife-sharpening shop, but the busines main focus was keys and lawnmowers. This time. I was going to do some research. My first call went out to The Cutler's Cupboard in Grossmont Center; I spoke with Tom.

"The cost to sharpen is
\$4 per knife. Plain-edged knives are done on about a one-inch belt-type grinder or sander. We finish them on cerami sticks. We can do most serrated knives, like bread knives, as long as the serrations are spaced out. Micro-serrations, like some steak knives, we can't do. The serrated stuff we do by hand

on a ceramic, triangular-shaped stone, so it will reach all the serrations - it's designed specifically for serrated knives.
"Most manufacturers suggest a sharpening once a year," concluded Tom. "We can usually sharpen your knives while you wait if

we're not really busy. But probably, no longer than an hour."
Next, I called Great News! cooking school

Next, I caned sreat News! cooking school in Pacific Beach. Their prices were lower, but your knives had to spend the night. The saleslady told me, "The average price to sharpen is \$1.50 per knife; a chef's knife would be \$2, but the little paring knives are only \$.75. It's generally a 24- to 48-hour

turnaround. We'll give you a call when they're ready." She added that Great News! sharpens only straightedged knives — no Fandiego in Claire mont was also unable to sharpen serrated knives.

Sharpening services ranged from \$3 to \$5 a knife, depending on its size. The wait was esti-mated at a couple of hours to a day, depending on how busy

the showroom floor was. Azar Electro in El Cajon required a three-day waiting period, with a price tag ranging from \$4.99 to \$8.99; depending on blade size. They did not sharpen serrated knives. Anthony at Winston Sharpen-

ing in Encanto told me that their prices started at \$2 and went up, depend ing on size. Serrated was no problem.
The cost for an average bread knife would be \$3.50. I asked if knives were the bulk of their business and about the turnaround. "No." he responded, "I'd say the bulk of my business is groomers [for] horses, dogs, and cats — their hair-clipper blades, shears, or scissors. Usually you can just wait for your knives, but normally people bring in their garden tools with their knives, all their household items, and we get them

back in one or two days." I was tempted. I knew I wanted both my straight-edged and serrated knives sharpened

and I didn't want to lose them overnight. But the more I mulled it over, the more certain I was that I didn't want the hassle of hauling five sharp blades around along with my children — it seemed to be inviting disaster — and that I wanted my knives sharpened by an experienced hand who specialized in cutlery.

My next call found just such a hand, and

one that was willing to come to me — Razor Sharp Mobile Sharpening, Owner Dan Jacobus, who has been sharpening knives for ten years, shot over later that afternoon to put the edge back in my cooking. Dan commiserated with me about the chef's knife, "Whoever did this didn't do a good job. They've buckled the knife," actually taking it out of curve near the base. He then explained

his own procedure. "Basically for a straight-edge knife, we sharpen both sides of the knife. We call that 'refacing' the knife. What it does is take the nicks out...we take the blade down past the nicks to get a new edge. We use a grit, similar to a stone, but ours is on a belt. We use the grit to take the metal off

and surface it. I use oil when and surface it. I use oil when I sharpen the blade. The oil keeps the temper of the knives — it keeps the heat away from the knife. I tell my customers

to wash the knife before using it on food. Then, "I polish the knife on two different types of wheels. One is a nylon wheel, and the other would be described as more of a cloth wheel. The polishing takes the scratches and blemishes out of the metal and hones it to a fin finish — and that's what gets your actual

sharpness.
"Now, for a serrated knife, there's two ways to do it. You can actually sharpen each ser-rated tooth separately, or run an edge along the back, which sharpens all the teeth at once. That's what we do, because [that way], you're not shrinking the knife down (as you sharpen Then we polish the front side." If need be, Dan will even re-serrate a knife that has been misused, putting the grooves and teeth back into a flattened blade (\$2–\$5 on top of the base fee of \$4, depending on the number of serrrations)
"That's kind of a long process," he says, "but

we can do it."

Dan stepped outside to his truck to sharpen my five knives. About 20 minutes later, they came back almost like new — the buckled edge, nicks, and light scratches were nowhere to be found and ight scratches were nowhere to be found.
(A few of the higher, nastier scratches proved
too deep to polish out.) "How long will this
stay sharp?" I asked. "Knives hold their sharpness to the quality of steel. This knife is good quality steel. German steel and Japanese steel are the best for cutlery, only because whatever they mix with the steel holds the edge a los longer than some other knives '

I didn't want to lose my newly recaptured edge, so I asked about maintenance. "You use what is called a steel — that's a grooved rod with a handle on it. You should hold the knife at a 30-degree angle to the steel, [then brush it away from you]. You're not sharpening the knife with your steel, you're maintaining it. What happens, from constantly chopping or slicing with a knife...if you looked at the edge of a knife under a microscope —

sometimes you can even feel

it — that edge will actu-ally be folded over to the side. That's when the knife gets dull. With the steel, you're straight ening that edge, or hon-ing that edge back to straight. But if you have nicks and stuff in the edge the steel won't touch it. Care

3 the fully run your fingers from the bottom up [from the back of the blade for ward!. When you feel that burr, then you need ward, when you feel that burr, then you need to use your steel." He recommends against using the steel too soon after resharpening, because if the angle is off even a little, it can actually be working to dull the edge.

As I mentioned, Razor Sharp Mobile Sharpening (619-460-8386) charges 54 per knife, but there is a \$30 minimum per visit. If you have only a few knives, Dan suggests going in on an order with neighbors or family members — or adding scissors or garden tools to make the minimum order.


