Who Speaks For **Parents?**

Thank you for your most revealing cover story by Matt Potter in the February 7 issue: "Stealth Candidate." However, there is one aspect of this whole San Diego Unified school board election campaign that needs further illumination: Where do city school parents fit in this whole maze of power politics run amuck?

The conventional wisdom that the Union-Tribune, the Chamber of Commerce, and the electronic media would like the public to buy into is that this whole San Diego Unified controversy is a "battle royal" between the teachers' union and the pro-Bersin forces. Yet, that's simply not the case. The actual fact is that this controversy is about children and families versus the overwhelming power of big government to inflict its will on those over whom it has jurisdiction and control. David versus Goliath. The stakes in the upcoming school board races are really about whether parents (on behalf of their children) will be allowed to be heard. With the current administration, only parents who say the right thing are allowed to be heard.

Case in point: The local press stood by and said nothing in January while Mr. Bersin and his team of lawyers and taxpayer-supported staff surgically expunged District Advisory Council parents who dared challenge the redirection of Title I monies to fund the so-called Blueprint for Success. Yet these volunteer parents were attempting to overcome what SDSU professor Vahac Mardirosian stated this week: "Too few low-income minority students, especially those from Latino families, attend four-year colleges." And why is that happening? One of the reasons is that in three years, the current administration in city schools has "redirected" \$220 million from its 96 compensatory education schools to support this board's so-called Blueprint — the one parents of this city totally rejected, yet was shoved down their throats. In other words, Mr. Bersin's cornerstone program is being financed on the backs of the poor, the disadvantaged, and the disenfranchised "minority kids." What makes the situation worse is that these

Krishna conscience The Washington Post is reporting that 12 of nearly 50 Hare Krishna temples in the United States, including one in San Diego, are set to file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy this month due to a \$400 million lawsuit alleging child abuse at the sect's boarding schools. Ninety-one former students at the now-defunct schools are claiming they were sexually, physically, and emotionally abused at Krishna schools in Southern California, West Virginia, and the state of Washington, the paper reports. Anuttama Dasa, director of communications for the International Society for Krishna Consciousness, told the paper that the case "threatens to shut down an entire religion. We've acknowledged in the past that there was abuse at some of the schools, but we don't believe that innocent members today and our temples should be threatened with closure because of actions by some deviants from the teachings of our movement 20, 30 years ago." The suit, filed in Texas, names 30 individuals and 19 Krishna-related corporations ... Meanwhile, up in Oregon, San Diego attorney Tom May, a partner at downtown's Luce, Forward, Hamilton, & Scripps, has come to the defense of a wilderness school for troubled teenagers that is under fire by the state for allegedly mistreating its students. Last week an Oregon judge slapped a temporary restraining order against the Obsidian Schools Wilderness Program after state investigators claimed that counselors didn't provide adequate care for four students with infections, frostbite, and a ruptured appendix, reports the Seattle Times. The Oregon Department of Justice has also lodged a racketeering complaint against the school, alleging criminal negligence in the death of a student in 2000. May's daughter, who attends the school, was cited by the state as a student whose finger had turned green after an untreated infection. He told the paper that the charges were overblown. "Her finger wasn't green," May was quoted as saying. "You know what it was? An ingrown fingernail." May added that the judge's order to move the students out of their forest snow camp and back to the school's headquarters in Bend "has essentially halted a treatment program for my daughter. This action is not in the best interest of the children and, in fact, is detrimental to them." May also was quoted as saying that rugged living conditions at the camp are a legitimate part of the school's regime. "Adversity is important. You don't grow muscles in weight-training without moving weight."

Glitter gulch San Diego's own **Monsignor "Father Joe" Carroll** has eked out a 4-3 vote of the Las Vegas City Council to

proceed with his MASH Village homeless shelter in the city of high rollers, reports the Las Vegas Review-Journal. The council voted over the objections of Vegas mayor and attorney-to-the mob **Oscar Goodman** to give Carroll's group ownership of a ten-acre parcel north of downtown. "We knew it would be close," Carroll said after the vote. A year ago, after an earlier proposal was rejected, Carroll said he had been "treated like dirt" by Good-

man, a longtime Carroll foe. Last week's action means that Carroll has five years to raise at least \$3.5 million to build his new homeless center or the land reverts back to the city. He assured the council that a new board of directors made up of Vegas locals would cure the project's persistent fundraising difficulties.

Undisclosed San Diego location With congressional midterm election season approaching, a parade of fundraising politicians is expected here. First comes Democratic senator Joe Lieberman, who parachutes into town next week for a high-dollar fundraiser on behalf of his personal political action committee. Next in line is Vice President Dick Cheney, who has emerged from his underground warren to come to California for a \$2500-a-head fundraiser for the Richard Nixon presidential library in Yorba Linda, Nixon's birthplace. After that, he heads down the road for San Diego, to attend an as yet "unspecified" fundraising event, reports the Orange County Register ... Mayor Dick Murphy is scheduled to be briefed today by his blue-ribbon committee on city finances and a tentative public airing of the committee's report at the city council Rules Committee is set for February 27, reports committee chairman Joe Craver.

Cops Question Database

n November, superior court judge William Nevitt denied a coalition of seven San Diego County police officers associations — plus

an association of district attorney researchers — access to a database that they claimed the Public Defender's Office was compiling on individual police officers and sheriff's deputies. The coalition, represented by attorney Everett Bobbitt, a former El Cajon police lieutenant, brought the suit after a period of negotiations following the December 2000 announcement by public defender Steven Carroll that his office was embarking on the project. Bobbitt begins the story.



"[Our concern] started with the public defender's office targeting for complaints a San Diego police officer who was making a lot of arrests of inebriates downtown. They were actually going around to courtrooms to people who were not represented by counsel who were arrested by this officer and getting them to generate complaints against him."

"I think officially the public defender's office will deny it," adds Bill Farrar, president of the San Diego Police Offi-

cers Association, "but we have evidence that individual attorneys that work for the public defender are out soliciting complaints against officers. I'm not going to name the officers, but one immediately comes to mind. He's an energetic officer who makes a lot of arrests, and some of the people he arrested became clients of the PDO [public defender's office] . But in the case I'm thinking of, the defendant wasn't even a client of the public defender's office. A deputy public defender was in the courtroom and recognized that an officer they think they have trouble with had made this arrest. So he approached the defendant and asked if he'd be willing to file a complaint against the officer. I mean, he was soliciting complaints! And he did it on more than one occasion with more than one person. That's the kind of thing that troubles

us. They're just looking for something they can use."

Carroll does not deny that one of his deputies, Dan Tandon, spoke to a defendant he wasn't representing outside of a courtroom. But he offers a different version of the story. "There was an incident of one of my deputies being in court and overhearing a defendant talking about being... I think it was an allegation that the officer had beaten the defendant. That's been turned into our soliciting somebody to complain."

And Carroll does not believe Tandon's actions were inappropriate "because what he was observing was something that was occurring in a public environment and a public forum. It would be wrong for him to simply ignore what he saw"

Cheese Biz

ules Wesselink's cheese operation, Winchester Cheese Company, couldn't have been smaller when it started. "I went to

Holland in 1995," says the Dutch immigrant, "for the 50th anniversary of our liberation from Germany. My relatives over there have a cheese farm with their own cows. They make gouda cheese, and that is where I learned to make cheese. I brought home a cheese-making kit to make two little

wheels of cheese. I made the two little wheels of cheese and gave some to friends to taste it. They said, 'Wow, if you make more, we'll buy it from you.' That's how it all got started."

Since the cheese kit, he's used an ice chest, then a 60gallon stainless steel tank, then 250- and 600-gallon



tanks. "Now we have a 1250gallon tank," Wesselink says.

The business began to take off when Wesselink started selling his cheese at farmers markets around Los Angeles and San Diego. "We went to Hillcrest on Sunday, Ocean Beach on Wednesday, Escondido on Tuesday, and other farmers markets around San Diego," he says. "When we went to the farmers markets, a lot of people started tasting it, and they're liking it. Then they contact us. And we've entered contests and won gold ribbons and first places with our cheese. Now we're in all the Henry's markets and Jimbo's in Escondido and Del Mar. We ship to Beverly Hills Cheese Store, to Murray's Cheese Store in New York, Gramercy Tavern Restaurant in New York, Cambara's Restaurant in Salt Lake City, and Bailey's Wine Country Cafe in Temecula."

Winchester won seven gold medals at the 2001 Los Angeles County Fair and will be featured in an international cheese show in Milan, Italy, in late September. Saveur, the gourmet magazine, did a feature on them in their May-June 2001 issue.

From 1951, when he came to the United States, until his trip back to Holland in 1995, Wesselink was a dairy farmer. The first two years he worked for other people. Then he opened his own farm in Artesia, moved it to Chino, and then to Winchester, eight miles north of Temecula, in 1978. Sixtyfour years old at the time of

his trip back "to the old country," he figured he would work the dairy a few more years before retiring. Now, he has sold that dairy and concentrates on his cheese gouda of various ages, some with flavors added.

Because he buys his milk from the dairy the cheese plant adjoins, Wesselink's gouda is considered "farmstead," a designation signifying that the cheese is made on the same farm that the cows who provided the milk live on. Of eight farmstead cheese makers in California, Winchester is the only one south of Visalia.

Winchester Cheese Company's label shows Holstein cows nibbling long grass in the shadow of wooden windmills. That's a nod to Wesselink's — and gouda's — Dutch heritage. The only thing his Winchester location

has in common with the label is the black-and-white Holsteins. The cheese plant consists of six refrigerated semi trailers, still on the wheels, clustered together between the dairy's milking barn and the modular building that houses the office and cheese store. An enclosed metal ramp leads from the office into one of the trailers. Wesselink starts a tour of the operation right there.

"You have to wear a hair net," he says, pulling one from a box sitting on a desk otherwise covered with broken-down cardboard boxes. "This is our packaging room, where we do all our mail orders around the United States. Jack, who works on this end and in the store, packages everything in the afternoon and it goes out UPS. During transportation, the cheese does not have to

be refrigerated on account of the aging process. That saves us a lot of money."

A door on one end of the packaging room opens to the enclosed ramp, which leads into one of the semi-trailers. Down the whole length of the trailer, six-foot stainless steel racks bearing creamy vellow wheels of cheese line both walls, leaving a narrow passage in the middle. "This is the aging room here," Wesselink explains, "where it's being aged to perfection. We have a mild, which is two months old; we have a g medium, which is three months old; we have a sharp, which is six months old; and \(\geq \) we have a super aged that's over a year old. We have very little of that in here. Then we have the cumin, with the cumin seeds in it, jalapeño, and the garden herb. These

my job as a police officer," Farrar adds. "I had to sue my exstepfather, when my mother died, over the issue of inheritance. That had nothing to do with being a cop. But there are court records on it. We were angry at each other at the time. If somebody went and interviewed him, he would probably tell them what an SOB I am. What does that have to do with my job as a cop?"

"And the greater concern," Bobbitt continues, "is the collection by a government agency - and they are a government agency - of per-

sonal data of that nature. If it were the prosecutor or the attorney general collecting information on some group, people would say, 'That's horrible. That's indefensible.' The government collecting data on people is improper. There's been a lot of case law that says unnecessary collection of personal data on citizens by government agencies is unlawful. And the California constitution, Article 1, Section 1, specifically mentions privacy."

Also, Bobbitt and police officers associations were worried about the public defender using the database to circumvent normal legal procedure governing the introduction of police personnel files into trials. "In California," Bobbitt says, "if you want to look into an officer's personnel file, you file what's called a Pitchess motion. It's an appropriate way to find out, with a judge's supervision, whether there's relevant material in a file. Let's say an officer arrests somebody and charges the guy with resisting arrest, but there's a belief that this officer is really the aggressor. The defense can file a Pitchess motion. Then, a judge must first look at the personnel file. He knows what the legal issue is, and he comes out and announces, 'I found the following relevant information, which will be turned over to the defense.' And then they normally issue a protective order that it should only be used for that case, and then

it must be returned to the prosecutor. Well, Steve Carroll has taken a much broader approach. What he wants to do is to be able to share any information on an officer in his data bank from one case to the other."

Bobbitt admits that any evidence that the public defender wanted to introduce in a particular case would have to be allowed by the presiding judge. "But if I'm the public defender," he complains, "I just can pull it out of my briefcase and ask the question, the prosecutor objects, and the judge might go to sidebar and say, 'Mr. Bobbitt, I'm going to sustain that objection.' But the question was asked and, even though there was no answer,

the jury is wondering what the answer might have been. There's where the damage is. I've seen that tactic used by a lot of attorneys. I frequently ask questions knowing that someone's going to object to it, and the judge might rule against me. But I ask the question anyway. You can't unring the bell, as they say. It hurts the credibility of the witness. And I'm concerned it will harm careers. Police chiefs will say, 'Look, every time that guy goes to court he gets asked embarrassing questions. It would be easier to put him in a desk assignment where he can't be out there.' But you don't get promoted in law enforcement unless you're doing law enforcement."

Bill Pettingill, the senior deputy county counsel who represented the public defender in the case, responds that that situation isn't likely. "That's the way it happens on TV. In practice, it doesn't really work that way, because there's not a public defender out there who would want to incur that wrath of the judge for trying to back-door some inadmissible evidence." Pettingill laughs. "In my 12 years of experience, I've seen lawyers try to back-door evidence in and the judge sanction them and berate them in front of people. In practice, it isn't going to happen. A lawyer doesn't want to jeopardize his or her own case by



engaging in nefarious practices. It's not worth it."

Steven Carroll believes the whole issue has been "sensa-

tionalized" by Bobbitt, the police officers associations, and by the *Union-Tribune*, which, in three stories, labeled the public defender's project a "database" and a means by which the defender would "research patterns of conduct —

and allegations of misconduct." "I would respond," Carroll says, "by saying it's not really a database. The word 'database' has the connotation that I've got this huge accumulation of electronic storage files that I'm compiling in

some kind of separate format, and it's not true. The idea is basically to have a retrieval system. All we're doing is trying to create a way to refind what we have once discovered as a part of case preparation. If one attorney on one case

discovers impeaching evidence about a police officer, it is our goal to not have that stuck in a hard-copy file and put on a shelf and forgotten so that a month later somebody has to reinvent the wheel and go find the same data."

Carroll adds, "When the story first appeared in the San Diego Union-Tribune, it threw out the hint that we were searching divorce records of police officers and digging into their private lives. In truth, we had one case where a private attorney had a record of domestic violence on a police officer. He gave us that information when we had that same officer on another case involving violence. But it becomes sensationalized when it looks like we're running over to the family court and digging through records to see if police officers are getting divorced and if their divorces hold allegations of violence. We're not doing that. We have never gone over to family court to mine their files."

After meetings between the two sides produced no resolution, Bobbitt sent a request to see the "database" under the California Public Records Act. Carroll refused, claiming that, though his office is funded by the county government, his files are privileged information between him and his clients, not government records open to public perusal.

In the meantime, the project was garnering statewide attention. The State Public Defenders Association named it their "Defender Program of the Year for 2001." And in April of last year, state senator Steve Peace of Chula Vista summoned Bobbitt and Carroll to a meeting on the issue in Sacramento.

In July, Bobbitt filed suit on behalf of the eight associations. On October 19, 2001, the two sides presented oral arguments before Judge Nevitt. In a ruling dated November 1, 2001, he denied Bobbitt's motion based largely on a 1981 United States Supreme Court decision, brought to his attention by Pettingill, in which the high court observed that a public defender "is not acting on behalf of the state; he is the state's adversary," and, "[A] public defender does not act under color of state law when performing a lawyer's traditional functions as counsel to a defendant in a criminal proceeding.

Bobbitt decided to appeal the decision and waits for the announcement of a trial date from the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals. ■



are also aged two months."

Wesselink picks up one of the 15-pound wheels, a foot in diameter and four inches thick, and flips it over. "We constantly have to turn them," he says. "What happens when they're first made, when they're fresh, they tend to bow out a little bit. Especially in the beginning, when they're fresh. So we have to flip them over."

At the far end of the trailer, a man sitting on an overturned bucket coats a wheel of gouda with a yellow liquid, which he applies with a small sponge. "This is Domingo," Wesselink says.

"He is painting the new cheese. You know when you buy gouda at the grocery store, and it's got the red wax all over it? Well, we don't use the red wax because when you put that wax on there, it doesn't allow the cheese to breathe, and it doesn't age properly. So we use this coating, which comes from Holland. It's a vegetable-fiber coating that you put on it so the cheese can still breath. And it's edible. You don't want to eat it though, because it sticks in your teeth."

Wesselink continues his reverse tour of the cheesemaking process by walking through a door into the adjoining trailer. Here, around 40 wheels of cheese float in tubs mounted at sink height along both walls. "This is the brine room," Wesselink explains. "The cheese, after we make it, goes into a brine bath. We don't put salt in our cheese when we make it, but we put it in a brine bath, and it stays in there for two days. Now these over here," he points to the right where some cheese wheels sit on racks, "are drying, and they go from here into the next room to be painted. We make about 50 cheeses a

The dominant feature of the next room is the rectangular 1250-gallon open tank about 12 feet by 4 feet filled with milk. A man wearing hair nets on his beard and head paces around the tank, eyeing the milk. "This is my son-in-law, David," Wesselink says. "He and my daughter Valerie are the cheese makers." He points to the milk on which a glossy, semi-solid surface is starting to form. "Here you see the milk has come in here. It was pumped in this morning, fresh out of the cows. Then they added the culture to it and the rennet that sets it up.'

Wesselink's daughter, Valerie Thomas, who has walked in behind him, explains. "The culture is a bacteria specific to gouda cheese. If we were making another kind of cheese, we'd use a different culture. We get it

from Holland. The rennet is an enzyme which helps in the firming up of our cheese. It's a necessary ingredient in our cheese-making. Many rennets are animal-based, usually from an animal's digestive tract. If you're making cow's milk cheese, you use rennet from cow origin. If we were making sheep cheese and using an animal rennet, we'd get it from a sheep source. Another type of rennet comes from a thistle plant. Another type of rennet is grown and harvested. Ours happens to be a vegetable-based rennet. Just by chance we started using that in the beginning of our cheese-making process. One of the benefits has been that

people who are on vegetarian diets, who don't want meat products in their diet, can eat this cheese."

Valerie steps to a sink up against the wall of the trailer and begins scrubbing her hands like a surgeon before an operation. "She's going to test the cheese," Wesselink explains. "She's going to stick her hand in that mess, then lift up. If the curd breaks in a straight line, it's ready to be cut."

When Valerie has finished washing her hands she dips her right hand, index finger extended, down through the curd, then curls it back up. The glossy curd splits in a straight line along



the length of her finger. She repeats the process all around the tank to make sure the whole batch has set up. "Sometimes it takes the milk 45 minutes to set up," she explains. "Sometimes it takes an hour, sometimes it takes an hour and 15 minutes to set up. You don't know. And you can't rush it. You've got to be on its time." After her last test dip, she

ing by with a "knife" imagine a tennis racket but metal with a square head bent 90 degrees to the handle and strings running only up and down — ready to "cut the cheese." With this knife he cuts the curds first side to side across the tank, then lengthwise. "See the pale yellow liquid coming up through the cut lines," Wesselink says. "That's the whey."

'Remember the nursery rhyme, 'Little Miss Muffet sat on a tuffet eating her curds and whey?' "David asks. "I remember thinking, 'What the hell are curds and whey?' When I started making cheese, I found out."

When David is done cutting the curds, he'll drain the whey out of the tank. It will go back to the dairy, where it's mixed with the cows' feed. After that first drain, he'll spray the curds down with hot water, which causes them to shrink and expel any more whey trapped in them.

When they're the proper consistency, neither too hard nor too soft, he and Valerie will pack them into wheelshaped molds. "Then the molds get stacked up four high over there," Jules says, "and they get pressed for about an hour and a half or two hours. Then we turn them over and press them for another hour and a half, two hours. We leave them overnight, and the next morning they go into the brine bath for two days.

They're turned every 6 hours while they're in the brine. Then they're taken out and left to dry. Then we put the vegetable-fiber paint on them. From there they go onto the shelf for aging. From that moment on, they're just lying there being turned all the time."

This process produces 8000 pounds of cheese per month, cheese that sells for between \$11.35 per pound for the "super aged" and \$5.95 for the plain mild.

Those are the retail prices. Wesselink won't divulge his wholesale prices.

Wesselink estimates that it would take \$150,000 to set up a cheese plant like his. "That's with trailers," he says. "If you had to put up a building it would cost a heck of a lot more."

With four full-time employees and three part-time, Wesselink says his profit margin is narrow but adds, "We are making a living out of it." ■





Starting To Get Interesting

his morning's newspaper informs me that the SDSU men's basketball team is 3-6 in the Mountain West Conference, which means the Aztecs hold down the seventh position in an eight-team league. This info-bit, in turn, reads like any February scorecard since the SDSU men's basketball team made their last NCAA tournament appearance. For historians, that was 17 years ago, back when Ronald Reagan was doing the Lindy Hop on the White House roof.

The hell with it. Enough of this tedious swill, let's turn the page and get on to the business of the Belorussian luge team captain and her unwanted pregnancy. Whoa. Hold it, hang on a minute, what is this? The Aztecs are 14-10 overall, and, even if you make allowances for the tradition of playing the first six games of every season against crippled children, 14-10, with, at least, six games to play, is a far better record than we have come to expect.

Regard the very respectable RPI (Rating Percentage Index), which has been used since 1981 as a tool by the NCAA basketball tournament selection committee. The RPI is a number that consists of a team's Division I winning percentage (25 percent), its schedule strength (50 percent), and its opponent's schedule strength (25

One version of the RPI lists the basketball programs of 32 athletic conferences across the country, including, of course, all the biggies: Atlantic Coast, Big 12, Big Ten, and Pacific 10. The list continues with all the also-rans: WAC, Big West, Big Sky, Missouri Valley, and blah-de-blah-blah. Like I said, 32 conferences in all. The Mountain West Conference is ranked seventh in excellence, which is 20 spots higher than I would have guessed.

Just to keep our happy faces smiling, let me add that SDSU makes a quite respectable showing in an important, some would say, the only important measuring statistic, known throughout the gambling universe as the ATS (Against The Spread). The ATS measures how a team performed versus the betting line, not whether the team won or lost.

One national service lists 235 collegiate basketball teams and records how each one has fared against the betting line. The number one team is USC, which has covered the spread 15 times. not covered five times, and pushed once. Number 235 is North Carolina, which covered the spread once, did not cover 14 times, and pushed once. The Aztecs are in 76th place, having covered the betting line 11 times and not covered 9 times. There were no pushes. This puts SDSU in the top one-third of the class, which is not bad, although I should add, not good enough to put one's own money into the fat, clammy hand of the neighborhood book.

The Aztecs are a funny team. I mean funny in the unpredictable sense of the word. Saturday, they played a good Utah team (second place in the Mountain West, 7-2 conference record, 17-5 overall) and lost 70 to 53. For those among us who are accountants, the preceding means that San Diego lost by 17 points. Even so, they were robbed; they should have lost by 30 points. That was an ugly, heartless, lazy game, interesting only in that you rarely see an entire team quit before the first half ends.

Then, two days later, San Diego beats BYU 77-73, the first time they'd thumped the Cougars since the last hours of 1996. Senior forward Randy Holcomb and Mike Mackell each scored 15 points and junior Deandre Moore swished four threepointers. The team hustled, played defense, handled the ball well, and, in general, looked like a legitimate Division I basketball club.

Wanna hear a scary story? It's precisely this kind of a schizophrenic performance that often foreshadows great success. Frequently, a team that is on the way from pathetic to sensational plays wildly different games from one night to the next. I'll deny I ever said this if asked about it in a courtroom, but the Aztecs may be in the process of becoming a very good basketball team.

Aztec players and the SDSU athletic department played the BYU victory like it was One for the Gipper. Their coach, Steve Fisher, was away, attending to a family emergency, and, just like the script says, the scrappy underdogs pulled together, played over their heads, and won one for their beloved leader.

That's unlikely. More likely, Monday night was an up-tick night on the crazy-performance


meter. No more and no less.



Last Sunday afternoon, Elder Nielsen, a Utah native and Mormon missionary, took a picture of the Salt Lake City Temple from his breast pocket and said, "While I've been doing my

missionary work, I've been showing this to people and asking, 'Have you seen this recently?' And they'll sort of look at me and say, 'No.' I'll say, 'It's the Temple. In Salt Lake City. Utah.' And they'll say, 'Utah?' I'll say, 'Yes, Utah. The Olympics. This year the Winter Olympics are in Salt Lake City, Utah.' And they'll say, 'Oh, I haven't been watching the Olympics.'

"I guess the deal is that the weather is always warm in San Diego and there aren't that many people who do winter sports. So, I guess there aren't that many people here watching the Winter Olympics.'

The Winter Olympics were what encouraged me, however, to visit a Mormon church, in this case Ward 10 in University City. The big beige stucco structure sat at the end of Governor Drive, surrounded by a tree-lined parking lot.

In the chapel, the choir practiced "America the Beautiful." Men and women bustled up and down the halls, some communicating with each other in American Sign Language.

In Mormon parlance, a "ward" is a congregation. A "branch" is smaller than a ward and is often organized for language or cultural reasons. Ward 10 is unusual in that it shares its worship service with a 35-member branch for the deaf. Ward 10's Bishop Michael Guymon told me that the ten-year-old deaf branch has had a remarkable effect on his congregation. "We've had many members take an interest in American Sign Language and learn to use it fluently. As a result, we've had a number of young people here who went on to study sign language and go as missionaries to the deaf community. Every Sunday night we have American Sign Language classes and people from all over the county come to attend."

The Mormon church has no paid clergy. A ward's administrative positions are filled by volunteers, and all adult ward members are encouraged to volunteer in one capacity or another. The bishop, who acts as a kind of senior pastor, oversees the running of the ward, counsels members, and communicates matters of doctrine and policy as handed down from the church hierarchy in Salt Lake City. The church suggests that members tithe 10 percent of their income. ("I don't say gross or net," Bishop Guymon said. "I just say 10 percent.") The ward collects tithes and sends them to Salt Lake, which then allocates the money to regional, or "stake," offices, which then disburse the funds on an as-needed basis. When I asked Bishop Guymon what his annual budget was, he said, "I really wouldn't feel comfortable divulging that." He paused. "I really don't know exactly. They know in Salt Lake. Salt Lake knows everything. They're really the center for all information.

Mormons take communion, or the "sacrament," every Sunday. Young men in ties and

crisp white shirts pass around polished silver trays that hold bits of bread and paper cups filled with water. The trays that hold the water have in their center small wells where members place their empty cups. This small convenience reminded me that Mormon doctrine instructs church members to "keep their home and surroundings clean."

Worship is often emotional. Last Sunday was a "testimony Sunday," when members are asked to speak on their faith's role in their lives. A 14-vear-old girl wept when she took the podium to discuss "My Experience of Personal Prayer." Her voice cracked when she gave special thanks to her parents. Lynn Lowder, an older gentleman, stood to talk about his work with the ward's

young men. "These fellows set wonderful examples. And we must all remember that others

pick us to be good examples. The curiosity they have about the Church will be encouraged by the example you set."

Throughout the service, ward members took turns standing by the podium, translating for the deaf branch. Elder Nielsen sat at the very front of the church, knee-to-knee with a deaf and blind gentleman. As Elder Nielsen signed, the deaf and blind gentleman lightly held his hands atop Elder Nielsen's hands.

When I at last spoke with Bishop Guymon he said rank-and-file Mormons were conscious of the publicity the Winter Olympics had given to their faith. But, he allowed, the church was "sort of downplaying proselytizing" in Salt Lake. Given all the attention, I asked him what was, for him, the most "rankling" misconception he encountered about Mormons.

"That we aren't Christians," he said. "It's just a fact that we are Christians. We believe in the same Christ as all other Christians."



Dear Aunt Trudy,

I'm 14 years old and I've recently figured out that I'm gay. Should I tell my mother? I don't think she'll be mad at me, but I fear she'll be very disappointed.

POINT LOMA TEEN

Dear Teen,

Your sexuality is an important part of your life and something to be proud of. Most of the information in this column comes from a gay psychotherapist I consulted about your question, which is a good one. He said you might want to contact an organization called PFLAG: Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. It's a national organization with chapters in many cities. Their mission is to provide support and services that promote the health and well-being of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered persons. You can find them online at www.pflag.org and www.youth-guard.org. The latter address is an arm of the organization focused on helping young people. PFLAG does have a San Diego chapter: the helpline number is 760-579-7640; e-mail is pflagsd@aol.com.

You might want to start by calling the helpline and talking to someone there about your dilemma. That way you can talk to a person who'll be friendly, supportive, and kind. They will not be angry or disappointed in you. By talking to them first, you can practice telling people who are going to be understanding, and who may be gay themselves, or have gay family members and friends, before you decide to talk to your mom. Lots of these folks have been through what you are facing and can offer you the benefit of their experience. This way, you'll have a support network in place to help you with difficulties you may have in talking to your mom. You can get to the point where you are feeling good about your sexuality and positive about talking to your mother about it, and then talk to her when you are ready. This could help your mother too, because if you are feeling positive about your sexuality, then when you tell her about it, hopefully she will pick up on some of your positive attitude. Start with people who will be easy to tell about your sexuality, like someone at PFLAG, and after that's successful, and you're used to the idea, you could move on to some of the more difficult people you want to tell. PFLAG has meetings you and your mother could attend to help her understand what's going on with you. Project 10 is another organization you might want to know about. They are a public school program dedicated to providing support services at schools to gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered, and questioning youth (www.project10.org). You might check out a book called Two Teenagers

in Twenty: Writings by Gay and Lesbian Youth, edited by Ann Heron and published by Alyson Press. It contains writing by teens like you. Good luck. I'm rooting for you, and for your mom, too.

Dear Aunt Trudy,

Here's an argument I'm having with my kids, 8 and 10 years old. They say I'm hopelessly antique because I require them to write thank-you notes when they receive gifts for birthdays or Christmas. The notes don't have to be long. A couple of lines is fine. But my offspring claim no one does this anymore. So I checked with other mothers, and lo and behold, they're right. No one we know makes their kids send written thank-yous. I'm outmoded and outvoted. Time to give up asking them to write notes?

CHULA VISTA MOM

Dear Mom.

I don't want to incur the wrath of your progeny. But just because a practice has fallen out of fashion doesn't mean it's valueless. People rarely seem to pull over for ambulances. give up their bus seats to the infirm, elderly, or pregnant, or hold doors open for each other these days. Maybe it's because I'm rather old myself, but the erosion of these civilities seems ominous to me — the opposite of progress. You could give in and tell them the notes are now voluntary. Or (and this is the course of action I favor) you could acknowledge that your kids are right (children love that). Tell them you've surveyed the neighborhood and thank-you notes are indeed a nearly defunct custom. Then you can have a two-way discussion in which you explain that sometimes a person behaves in a particular way not because it's what everyone else is doing at the moment, but because it is right and kind. You want them to continue writing the notes for that reason. When they're of age, they can decide for themselves whether they want to be humanists or Philistines.

Kiss Kiss Kiss Kiss




Christie Ridgway's 11th published novel, *This Perfect Kiss*, opens with the heroine, a vintage-clothing dealer, heading for an afternoon appointment. She's dressed in a tight-fitting, flesh-colored chiffon evening gown out of which her voluptuous breasts keep threatening to spill. (For reasons beyond her control, she hasn't changed into the business suit she'd planned to wear.) She's also late, which irritates the man she's meet-

ing, a wealthy software mogul described as "six lean feet of black hair, blue eyes, and unusual, almost exotic features."

The two get off to a rocky start; she has to badger him to let her help liquidate his grandfather's estate. To any seasoned romance reader, it's clear by page eight that these two will wind up having passionate and extended sexual intercourse (which will be described in graphic detail). Various misunderstandings and tensions will complicate their wild mutual attraction. But by the end of the book, they'll be bound together for life.

Caidwater, the estate where much of the action in *This Perfect Kiss* takes place, includes a 44-room mock Moorish castle set amidst eight separate gardens and "acres of undeveloped land...crowning the highest ridge of hills ringing Hollywood." The author of this fantasy lives in an old neighborhood near the base of Mt. Nebo in La Mesa. Ridgway's property is a corner lot distinguished by a majestic California pepper tree that sits on a bank of ivy sloping down to the street. Ridgway is conscientious about decorating her house, a two-story tan edifice with teal and white trim. This past Christmas, for example, a Santa and sleigh pulled by five reindeer stretched across the low front roof, and on the porch a wagon held several potted poinsettias. Inside the house, golden-toned wood floors gleam. Ridgway and her husband of 18 years

between now and the beginning of next year.

All her published-book credits place Ridgway among the more prolific romance writers of Southern California, which in turn ranks as one of the steamiest hotbeds for the genre nationwide (second only to Texas). The Orange County chapter of the Romance Writers of America includes about 300 members, making it the largest in the country, and the 20-year-old San Diego branch is also hefty, with a membership of more than 100 women, including 20 or so who have published.

Their collective aim is to help satisfy the voracious appetite among American women for sto-

ries about male/female relationships that "end in a way that makes the reader feel good." That's how the national writer's organization defines romance on its website. These novels "are based on the idea of an innate emotional justice — the notion that good people in the world are rewarded and evil people are punished." Lovers "who risk and struggle for each other and their relationship" receive "emotional justice and unconditional love."

The sale of such stories amounted to \$1.37 billion in 2000, according to the writer's group. In that year alone, almost 2300 romance titles were released, making romance far and away the most impor-

tant segment of the book market — accounting for 55.9 percent of all popular paperback fiction sales. That's twice the percentage claimed by mystery and suspense paperbacks combined (28.1 percent) and more than four times that for "general fiction" (12.9 percent). A 1999 survey of reading habits commissioned by the Romance Writers of America found that 41.4 million people aged ten and older — 18 percent of the reading-age population — had read a romance within the past year.

Women (and a small percentage of men) obtain these books from a variety of outlets. Some

get monthly shipments in the mail. Others pick up paperbacks in airports, supermarkets, drugstores. Still others turn to bookstores, both the big chains and smaller stores, such as Gracie's Book Nook in National City, the Book Mark in Escondido, or Nina's Books on El Cajon Boulevard, that have a reputation for their robust romance sections. The ultimate local amatory outpost, however, is Romance World in El Cajon.

Picture a parking lot a block away from the Parkway Plaza shopping center. At one end looms a Michael's craft emporium, and along two sides, long arcades hold back the concrete sea. The overhang of the arcades makes it hard to see the businesses tucked within them. but the strip that shelters the used-tuxedo shop and the hair salon and the plussize dress store is also home to a vast storehouse of literary love.

Owner Mary Roscom estimates that Romance World contains more than 100,000 volumes, with maybe 80 percent of them romance. Most are paperbacks, the majority used. In the five years she's owned the business, Roscom has developed a ruthless system for organizing her stock. The newest books face the front door, just steps from the entrance. After a few weeks, they move to the sides of their bookstands. Those unsold later shift again to a lowlier perch. Roscom's cash register and central work

area command the space just beyond the new books. Around and beyond this administrative island, Roscom has created tidy nooks for the used books. Labels hint at the head-spinning varieties within the genre: historical, paranormal, contemporary, inspirational, and more.

"Everything you could get another way - military, horror, mystery, scifi --- you can get in romance," Roscom declares. She says whenever she tries to read a straight mystery, she always thinks afterward, "That was good, but it was just missing the romance."

A rotund woman with short thin hair, thick glasses, and an astute air, Roscom worked as a post-office clerk for 12 years before she bought the romance-book business from the man who had started it in the late 1980s. She was shopping in

his store one day when she heard that the enterprise might be for sale. She pressed for details. She'd always dreamed of owning a store, had considered and rejected selling pets. ("I started thinking about how they get diseases. Some of them die.") She'd thought about rubber stamps. ("I've been rubber-stamping for 21 years.") But romance books had also become important in her life.

Although most of her customers started reading romance in junior high school, Roscom didn't begin until she was 40. Her discovery came in 1993, at a time when she was reading magazines but not much else. One day, called for jury duty, "I picked up an old Victoria Holt," she remembers. When she returned from her courthouse stint and reported to her postal coworkers her disappointment with Holt's trademark Gothic style, they protested that Gothic romance was passé. "There's no sex," Roscom now states with authority. "It's more dark and depressing — somebody you know is really a bad person. That sort of thing." One acquaintance pressed a copy of Julie Garwood's Honor's Splendor upon her, and its light, funny tone bewitched Roscom. "It's not incredibly spicy, but there is some sex. And it definitely makes you feel good when you read it." Reading it "put me on the path of no return."

Roscom's friends pointed her to other books. "And I started branching out pretty quickly." She began keeping a computerized list of every romance novel she read. On this list, she notes the one-to-five-star rating accorded each book by Romantic Times, the monthly bible of the industry. Next to that, she logs her own opinion of how many stars each book deserves. A few years ago, Roscom recorded her 1000th entry. Some of her customers were incredulous. Surrounded by all those books, how could Roscom not have devoured more? But Roscom isn't the fastest reader. She figures most people consume 60 to 90 romance pages per hour but says her speed falls at the low end of that range. It's a rate that allows her to complete a book every two to four days, depending on the length. In contrast, "I have customers who say they can whip right through two or three a day," she discloses.

What Roscom lacks in speed, she makes up for in retention. "I can tell you about every book I've ever read." Pick out a listing at random, The Passionate Ghost, for example, and she can deliver a quick précis: "That's part of a whole series of books about ghosts. They're Regency period, and basically they're all about this house that's haunted by this ghost. He appears to just a few people in the first book, and at the end you find that he was madly in love with the lady who's now the grandmother matriarch through all the books. She dies and they end up together in the last one. It's really a cute little story."

If you ask Roscom about one of Christie Ridgway's books, however, she'll tell you she hasn't read any of them. She's made a point of avoiding books by San Diego County writers; she thinks if she disliked one and a customer asked her about it, she'd have to be truthful. But she would feel bad about doing so. Instead, her abstention allows her to say that she doesn't have an opinion.

Unlike Roscom, Christie Ridgway followed the classic path to romance fandom. Ridgway says in sixth grade she started buying Harlequin romances from the Woolworth in the small Bay Area town where she grew up. "I loved them. My friends and I would trade them back and forth." Nowadays the books "have more sensual content than they did at that time," she notes. She herself writes books she wouldn't recommend to a sixth grader, because of their explicit sexuality. "But back then they were okay."

Trim and blond, Ridgway has the sort of wholesome good looks often seen in actresses playing housewives in TV commercials. A quote from *Publishers* Weekly that appears on the cover of This Perfect Kiss could apply as well to her as to her creation: "SMART, PEPPY..."

Almost as far back as her memory goes, she wanted to write. "I have spiral notebooks of my writing going back to second grade. Every Christmas my mom would give me a new notebook." Ridgway did some news reporting in both high school and college but finally decided she wasn't good at





iournalism. She shrank from asking tough questions. "I could feel people being uncomfortable, so I would back off." At UC Santa Barbara, she studied English, however, rather than yielding to her parents' conviction that a business major would be more practical.

In college, she met and fell in love with her future husband, now a high school and Grossmont College math teacher. A few years after graduation, they married, eventually settling in La Mesa, his hometown. By then Christie had decided that technical writing might be a way to make a living with words. She got a job with a local company but before long learned how to do computer programming for the firm. It paid better, and she says it provided psychic payoffs too. She likes the idea of everything fitting into little boxes. In an alternate life, she could imagine herself designing websites or being an interior decorator, bringing order to an untidy world.

Her study of literature in college had consumed all her reading time, and the programming job further influenced her pleasurereading choices. "I was a young woman working with a lot of men in a very male setting." She traveled a lot, and on airplanes and job sites, surrounded by older men, she wasn't comfortable burying her nose in paperbacks plastered with images of bosomy young women wrapped in torrid embraces with tall, darkeyed men. Instead, Ridgway read thrillers - novels by Robert Ludlum and the like, whose covers depicted knives dripping with blood.

Reflecting on those years, Ridgway feels bad that she denied herself the pleasure of the books she loved. She didn't go back to romances until her first son turned two (at the end of 1990). She was still working part-time as a programmer, and one day an old friend asked why she wasn't writing.

The question made her stop and think. Ridgway began checking romance books out of the library. She recalls being "enthralled" by some of the work of Patricia Veryan. "They're Georgian-era historical romances. I was just so taken away. And I thought, 'I don't care how long it takes, or what I have to do, but I could learn to do this. I've learned to do lots of other stuff that I didn't even like so much."

Within a short while, "I called my mom. I called my brother." She announced to them, "I'm going to be a romance writer." If they harbored doubts, no one laughed in her face. She joined the San Diego chapter of the Romance Writers of America and began attending a critique group to which members brought five pages of new writing each week."We would read them to each other and comment. It was fabulous! So helpful." The other members of the group shared with her practical tips about publishing within the genre, and Ridgway says her confidence began to grow. "It was very much like a women's group."

In the group, she completed her first novel, the story of a one-time high school boyfriend and girlfriend who meet again years after graduation. Sent off to publishers, it brought in her first crop of rejections. "I probably didn't have as good an understanding of story form as I do now," Ridgway reflects."I remember trying to think of events: 'Okay, they can go on a picnic!' Well, no. Plot comes out of character," she says she now knows. Back then, "I probably didn't come up with characters that changed enough."

She started a second book, though today she can't remember much about it. She joined a new critique group in which members were challenging each other to write as much as possible, some producing 20 pages a week. This seemed like a lot after the 5-page-a-week regime. But Ridgway had an idea she thought might sell. At a romance writer's conference, she'd learned about a new line of books from Silhouette Books. The editors wanted stories in which the hero and heroine are brought together by the written word — an ad, for example. "Being from California, I came up with a message in a bottle. That made sense to me," Ridgway recalls. She began spinning out the tale that later came to be titled The Wedding Date. (Its heroine,

seething with anger over being dumped by her fiancé, hits the beach in search of a tall, blond, and handsome surfer type to take to her ex's wedding. Growing desperate, she slips a cryptic pink note into a two-liter diet cola bottle, and this action results in her meeting Mr. Right.) About three months after starting it, Ridgway had a complete manuscript in hand. "That book sold. They were looking for something in a very contemporary voice," Ridgway says. "And that's what it had."

Within the field of romance writing, there are two overarching subdivisions: category (also called series) books and single titles. Ridgway explains that The Wedding Date was one of the former. Writers of category books have to meet very specific criteria. Harlequin's Blaze line, for example, demands 70,000 to 75,000-word-long stories that have "a strong sexual edge," according to the publisher's editorial guide-



lines. Heroes and heroines in Silhouette's Romance line (53,000 to 58,000 words)"don't actually make love unless married, [but] sexual tension is vitally important," the guidelines state.

In contrast, the (mandatory) Christian characters in all Steeple Hill Love Inspired stories (70,000 to 75,000 words) have "sweet romances" in which "any physical interactions (i.e.,

kissing, hugging)...emphasize emotional tenderness rather than sexual desire." In Mills & Boon Medical Romances (50,000 to 55,000 words), "An exploration of patients and their illness is permitted, but not in such numbers as to overwhelm the growing love story."

More than just their short length and circumscribed content characterize the category offerings, Ridgway says. They're also marketed in distinctive fashion, more like periodicals than books. The publishers release a certain number of titles, usually four to six, in each line every month. They mail some as a package directly to subscribing readers. Storeowners can pick and choose what to order from among these monthly offerings, but Ridgway says many don't discriminate. They're buying a commodity: the explicit sexual romps of Blaze; the decorous Steeple Hill romances. "Then the next month comes around, and those books are all pulled off the shelves and replaced with the new ones. Sort of like a magazine."

A single-title romance book, in contrast, "is not a prepackaged thing," Ridgway says. Longer and widerranging in their content, these books receive more marketing attention from the publishers, who display their offerings in catalogs and send sample covers to bookstore owners. The storekeepers in turn base their decisions on such factors as how well each author has sold for them before and how attractive the cover is. "The cover makes a big difference about how something is going to sell," says Roscom, who orders more copies of volumes bearing crisp, attention-grabbing

Ridgway points out that single-title books have some drawbacks compared to their category counterparts. "I have to tell you that Harlequin/Silhouette [the colossus of the categorybook publishers] is great to work for. They pay really well, and when you go out under the Harlequin/Silhouette umbrella, people know what they're getting." In contrast, "In the singletitle world, hey, it's you by yourself, hoping that someone recognizes you. They've never seen your name before. Why would they buy your book over someone else's? It doesn't have that automatic draw."

So she was delighted when within six months of her first book being accepted, she sold another category novel to Silhouette's Yours Truly line, this one using the device of a groom getting a note calling off the wedding as he was in the dressing room preparing for the ceremony. "I had kind of figured it out. I was getting it — understanding the form," Ridgway says. Four more sales to Yours


Truly ensued, though over time the publisher dropped the written-word gimmick. In 1999 Ridgway shifted to writing for Silhouette's Special Edition category, a homey line in which the typical heroine is the woman next door. "She's not going to have a job as a spy. She's going to work at the preschool or as a caterer. That kind of hearthy thing."

Around the same time, at the urging of her literary agent, she ventured into the single-title arena. "In terms of ultimately becoming a multimillion-dollar famous author, you have to move to single-title because only the single titles get the widest distribution in the most locations." Ridgway felt as if she were starting over again. "The books are much longer, and I was writing for a somewhat different audience with different expectations." Her heart sank when her editor rejected the first 100 pages she submitted, asking her to go deeper, hit everything harder, make every disappointment more wrenching. "I think probably I had been just skating over the surface of

the emotions," she reflects today. Ridgway rewrote the beginning, and the book at last reached publication in February 2000 under the title Wish You Were Here.

Set on a fictional island off the coast of Southern California, it tells the story of a jet-jockey-turned-astronaut who flees to the island to recover after being temporarily blinded in a car accident. There he falls under the spell of the sexy and beautiful woman who runs the bed-and-breakfast where he's hiding out from reporters. "It's a homebody/wanderer story. She's the homebody. She's somebody who won't leave an island because she feels she's only safe there. In fact the name of the island is Abrigo, which means shelter in Spanish. And he's somebody who's not only wandered the earth but the universe. His name is Yeager Gates, because he's the gate to the world for her." By the end of the book, the heroine is willing to leave, but the hero chooses to stay on the island and start a flying service.

"I love all my single titles, like, desperately," Ridg-



way confesses. "It stabs me in the heart, I love them so much." She followed up the astronaut book with the Los Angeles-based romance between the software mogul and the well-endowed vintage-clothing vendor. That book gave Ridgway her first experience with seeing her name on a best-seller list. For one week, This Perfect Kiss occupied the 126th slot on USA Today's compilation of the top-selling 150 books in the United States.

Ridgway's third single-

title effort, First Comes Love, came out last month and made it up to number 117 on the USA Today list. For this book, she kept the action in California but shifted the focus to a small town loosely modeled after Nevada City. "The heroine works in a little living-history district where people dress in costume and live supposedly like they did in the Gold Rush time." To make it interesting, Ridgway decided that many of the townsfolk should be descendants of the original settlers. The heroine is the great-greatgreat-granddaughter of the madame who once ran the local brothel. "So who would the hero be?" the author asks. "Of course he has to be the descendant of the first lawman in the town. I mean, it just goes."

Two characters who are peripheral in this book will move to center stage in Ridgway's next single-title book, scheduled for publication in January 2003. She says romances never follow a character or characters through a series of books the way mysteries (and often thrillers) do. The happyever-after endings preclude that. By the final page, all the tension has drained away; the quest for true love has been fulfilled. But looser linkages are a common romance convention. Harlequin, for example, publishes one popular "continuity series" called Montana Mavericks. The more than 30 books that constitute it are all set within the same fictional Montana town. Authors, including Ridgway (who was asked to write one of the latest installments), have to follow written guidelines known as "The Bible." Ridgway received a one-page outline of what she was expected to write. It described the heroine's conflict, as well as how the lovers needed to meet. The outline dictated that a lesser character needed to get food poisoning at a wedding (in order to pave the way for developments in a later book). Ridgway says that the experience was a bit like writing a soap-opera installment.



Although Ridgway has moved outside California for at least one other book (set in Oklahoma), she's never traveled back in time or into other dimensions (such as space or the paranormal) the way some of her peers do. Pressed to classify her writing, she refrains from calling it romantic comedy "because I think that undercuts the emotional content." But comedv is "a pivotal element in everything I write. There are usually some real comedic scenes." Also, "The characters always have a sense of humor, so there'll be moments when you smile to yourself, or hopefully even laugh out loud."

Sex is another universal element in her work. None are "sweet romances," she says, referring to the chaste narratives in which "the characters don't consummate their feelings for one another." In Ridgway's work, "They do. And with detail and using 'The Words." She says when she decided to become a romance writer she knew she would have to write such scenes. She enjoyed reading them in other people's books, and not to include them in her own work somehow "wouldn't be fair."

Creating fictional sex has demanded a certain amount of revelation and vulnerability, she acknowledges. "You would assume that if I'm writing about a particular sex act that I at least think I've done it before." A self-conscious laugh res-

cues her from her tangled syntax. "But I've gotten more comfortable with it, and I think I've gone even farther with it than I thought would be possible. Because it's always about the characters. And they aren't me. When I'm writing a love scene, I really don't think it's me. I think it's a story about the characters, so I don't feel uncomfortable."

Forcing one's characters to keep their clothes on can be challenging, Jill Limber attests. Limber is the current copresident of the local romance writer's chapter. A friendly, down-to-earth woman who lives on a gracious street in the upper reaches of Mission Hills, Limber studied behavioral science in the late 1960s at San Diego State and worked in management for the phone company before getting pregnant with her first child in 1974. "I took a very

long maternity leave that lasted, oh, 18 years," Limber says. She always read a lot. Autobiography, popular fiction, nonfiction, particularly history — all this she enjoys, but since her college days, at least half her reading has consisted of romance. "I've always been a sucker for a good love story," she says, "whether it be a movie or a book or someone telling how they met their husband." At some point, the flash of insight that launches so many romance-writing careers struck her: the thought that she could figure out how to tell such stories herself.

But where to start? Her solution was to enroll in a master's program in creative writing at UCSD. Under the tutelage of a professor who "was very accepting of all the genres," she began crafting a romance novel and took other classes that

interested her, then decided to drop out of the program and concentrate on writing. Limber figures she worked on that first book, a yarn about Civil War spies, for five or six years, writing and rewriting it and feeling some despair as it accumulated an inch-thick file of rejections. "They did get nicer and nicer over time," she notes. But she finally set her first effort aside. She resolved to give her career as a romance writer one more chance. She would start a second book, and if it didn't get published, she would expand the catering business she had dabbled in for years.

Limber outlined a story about a feisty young woman whose cattle-rancher father dies leaving a will that requires her to get married or lose the land. The heroine finds an unlikely candidate for this marriage of

convenience, a man facing the gallows, and true to the well-worn format, he ends up winning her heart. Limber blasted through a rough draft of this story in six weeks, then queried several publishers about it right before the 1996 Christmas holidays. HarperCollins astonished her by asking to see the full manuscript just two weeks later. "I very quickly finished the book, and a couple weeks later, they bought it. And my catering business went down the drain!"

Further sweetening this news was the fact that the publisher wanted the book for a summer promotion and so printed 98,000 copies that were sold for a special price of \$3.99, versus the \$4.99 that was more standard for paperbacks of that size at that time. Because of the large print run, Limber wound up making more from the sale than do most first-time authors, who can make as little as \$1000 or less. Pressed for details about how much money romance writers earn, Limber hesitates. "It's kind of an unspoken rule that you just don't talk about it." Even within the romance writer's organization, little discussion of the subject takes place, she savs. Sometimes a woman will say that she just got a "really great" advance, but "I don't know what that means," Limber confesses. The advance that Limber received for her current (fifth) book "is double what I got for my first book, but

it still is only \$6000. So when somebody says, 'I got a really fabulous advance,' I don't know if they mean that they've been getting \$1500 advances and then they got a \$6000 advance. You just don't know." Whenever a newcomer declares her intention of making a living at romance writing, Limber tries to be straightforward about the likelihood of success at that. Some writers do earn \$100,000 or more per year, but not many. "If somebody has unreasonable expectations, I might just say, 'Hey, look, can you live on \$10K a year? At least for the first couple of years?"

Nonetheless, the news of her first sale, in 1997, buoyed her spirits and inspired her to pull out her Civil War spy story and rewrite it yet again. It sold to the Kensington Publishing Corporation in 1999. "Then I decided that the historical market was getting weak, so I wrote a contemporary and sold that one."

Limber's first three books included sex scenes that she classifies as "very sensual." She no longer recalls if Romantic Times magazine rated them according to its scale, which runs from Sweet ("May or may not include lovemaking. No explicit sex") through Sensual, Very Sensual, and Spicy, up to Sexy ("Borders on erotic. Very graphic sex"). Limber's fourth book, another contemporary romance, would probably have fallen at the hotter end of the spectrum, but one



day she heard a talk that made her reconsider her strategy. One of the Harlequin/Silhouette editors, describing the Silhouette Romance line, was making the point that "oftentimes authors will include sex scenes when actually the story might be better suited to having more sexual tension rather than actual sex," Limber recalls. Hearing this, she thought about the heroine she was in the process of developing: a beautiful 25-year-old woman who would be making her way from Seattle to New York after being dumped by her fiancé. Limber was planning to get this girl stuck in Montana, where, to earn some money, she would take a job working as a nanny for a rancher. He was going to need a nanny because his wife would have run off with his brother, leaving behind their ten-monthold baby. ("I just happened

to have a ten-month-old grandson at the time I was writing it," Limber confides. "He was my model.")

Limber realized that this story might fall under the rubric the editor was describing. "I pitched it to her at the conference, and she said to send it to her." Omitting the sex scenes "worked out well because the gal had just been jilted and wasn't interested in a relationship. She thought she was moving on." The hero, in turn, was reeling from the betrayal by his wife and brother. "So it made sense in this story that these two people could be very, very attracted to each other, but for personal reasons they would say, 'I'm just not going to do that."

The 15-Pound Matchmaker is scheduled for release this coming May, and last December, Limber sold another book proposal to the Silhouette Romance line.



At the time of the sale, she knew what would bring the hero (a former Navy SEAL working as a handyman) and heroine (an aspiring children's writer who hires him to help her with a house renovation) together, but "How I'm going to keep them from sleeping together is going to be interesting," she disclosed, adding, "it is very difficult for me to have two healthy, young, single adults together on the page throughout the book without consummating the relationship."

The switch from historical to contemporary romance also has continued to be challenging. Whereas the dialogue in historicals tends to be "more stilted and formal," Limber says, "In a contemporary, it's very snappy and upbeat. I'm 53 years old, and snappy young dialogue is something I don't do." She gets around this problem in a variety of ways. She presses her twentysomething son and daughter for current parlance. She watches Dawson's Creek, the Gilmore Girls, Buffy the Vampire Slayer. "That's very helpful. You have to stay really tuned in to the younger culture."

To the charge that romance writing is formulaic, Limber counters that "it no more has a formula than mysteries do." In the detective genre, "You have to solve the mystery by the end of the book." In romance, publishers make a promise to their readers that their books "will be a love story and will have a happy ending." Beyond that, Limber enumerates a few other principles underpinning the genre. "In any romance, the characters have to be on opposite sides of an issue or in opposition to each other." She says a classic example might involve



bringing together an environmentalist and a land developer. "And then they have to find a way to work it out. Otherwise, you don't have a story. Like my husband and me: Boy meets girl. They fall in love. They get married. They live happily ever after. There's not much of a story there," Limber says with a wry smile.

She says romance writers also understand "that a lot of romance readers do not want to get heavily into controversial subject matter. You want entertainment. You want to get away from real life." Furthermore, within the books, "There's a real moral code." Danielle Steel falls outside the pale because her books have ambivalent endings, and the characters often do unheroic things. In romance, "A heroine would never have an affair," Limber says. "A hero would never walk away from a child, even if it was conceived during a one-night stand.... Part of the fantasy of romance readers is that they become the characters that are in the book." Limber laughs at the memory of a comment made by her



husband when he first began proofreading her work. "He said, 'You know, I'm not sure a guy would say this.' " She retorted, "This is why women read romance! Because the guys say what we need for them to say.

These are our heroes!"

The hero's point of view is an essential fixture of the romantic terrain, the writers point out; some have even argued that it's the men who carry the books. Laura Kinsale, a former petroleum geologist who left the oil business and produced a string of historical best-sellers, starting in the late 1980s, argues in a 1992 collection of essays about romance



writing (Dangerous Men and Adventurous Women: Romance Writers on the Appeal of the Romance) that "as she identifies with a hero, a woman can become what she takes joy in, can realize the maleness in herself, can experience the sensation of living inside a body suffused with masculine power and grace...can explore anger and ruthlessness and passion and pride and honor and gentleness and vulnerability.... In short, she can be a man."

Another essay in the collection tackles the genre's much-ridiculed language. "Descriptive passages are regularly culled from



romance novels and read aloud with great glee and mockery by everybody from college professors to talk show hosts," write Linda Barlow (a one-time lecturer in English at Boston College) and Jayne Ann Krentz (a.k.a. Amanda Quick, a former academic and corporate librarian). "You would think that we romance novelists would have the wit to clean up our act.... Yet we persist in penning sentences like 'Caught up in the tender savagery of love...she saw him, felt him, knew him in a manner that, for an instant, transcended the physical. It was as if their souls yearned toward each other and, in a flash of glory, merged and became one.'

"Are we woefully derivative and unoriginal?" Barlow and Krentz ask. "Do our editors force us to write this way?" Rather, they argue that such language represents a code "clearly understood by readers but opaque to others." The effusive imagery and "Lush use of symbols, metaphors, and allusion is emotionally powerful as well as mythologically evocative.... Each word conjures up vivid images in the minds of the readers, and the combination of so many evocative phrases in a short passage of prose creates for the reader a dynamic, multilayered intellectual and emotional gestalt.... Like a secret handshake, the codes make the reader feel that she is part of a group."

When Janet Wellington decided to become a romance writer, she couldn't have been more of an outsider. She hadn't read a single romance novel. Yet her example illustrates how a diligent newcomer can not only crack the code but reproduce it well enough to sell her work.

For the past 7 years, Wellington has been an executive assistant and secretary at San Diego Hospice, but "I have lived many lives in my short 46 years," she says with a laugh. Raised in Wisconsin and Illinois, she was a hairstylist before moving to San Diego in 1983. Once here, she stayed in the beauty business for a while, then switched to doing marketing for a series of enterprises ranging from a local nutrition foundation to the Broadway department store. One day in 1992 she happened to read an article about local romance writers. This came at a time when she had begun to yearn to write fiction. But it was very clear to her that she also wanted to see her work published."And that pushed me into romance because of the statistics," she says. "They're always looking for new writers because they publish so many darn books. The statistics are huge!"

The first romances she read repulsed her. "I probably got them at a garage sale or something. They were really old — something our grandmothers

would have been reading." Undeterred, Wellington enrolled in a half-day class at the local Learning Annex taught by an Orange County writer named Diane Pershing. Wellington says when she later read some of Pershing's books, she loved them. "They were about women solving problems. They were not about inequality. They were about equalizing partnership." In one of the books, the heroine was a little chubby. "She was a little older than the guy. They were of different religions." Wellington's preconceptions vanished, and in 1995 she joined the San Diego and Orange County chapters of the Romance Writers of America and gave herself a deadline: "If I didn't sell a book in five years, I wouldn't permit myself to sink any more money into it. Because I was buying books. I got a computer. I was going to conferences."

Dreaming up a story proved easy. "One day I was walking in the Gaslamp Quarter," she recalls. From a bookstore window display, she learned that Wyatt Earp had once lived in San Diego. "Gosh, that must have been really exciting," she remembers thinking. What must life here have been like? This "germ of an idea about time travel" prompted her to read about the period, and over the next year, she spun out a yarn about a modern-day San Diego school nurse who gets sent back in time to 1888. Within two pages of realizing what has happened to her, the horror-struck heroine meets a bartender whom Wellington describes to readers in the following manner: "He was neatly dressed in a clean white shirt and ornate crimson and black brocaded vest. Wisps of curly hair peeked from above the loosely knotted silk string tie. His inky black hair was combed back and seemed to be cut in longer layers than most of the other men's. A few untamed tendrils curled onto his forehead. He was clean shaven, with a generous mouth that...was quick to smile."

Rose, the heroine, predictably falls in love with him, but complicating matters is the fact that he's plotting to kill Wyatt Earp. By the end of the book, Rose has straightened out the

misunderstanding behind the intended mayhem, bedded the barman, seen him murdered — and met his modern-day reincarnation (after she's been returned to the present day).

Although the book was easy to write, Wellington soon learned that paranormal romance is one of the hardest forms of romance to sell. "The readership is extremely loyal," she says. "But it's also a very small sector of the romance market." So she resolved to "learn how to write a contemporary romance — because of the bigger market share."

To the task of producing such a tale, Wellington applied herself with the diligence of an honor student. "I remember taking ten books from within one line and reading the first three chapters of each of those books and figuring out how much is dialogue. How often are the hero and heroine together? Where was the first description of her? Of him? I analyzed those first three chapters to understand the ebb and flow." She studied first lines and finally decided to open her book

with this one: "All I need is one cowboy for one night. No problem."

Wellington had learned that cowboys still play a central role in the fantasy lives of many American women. She wanted to exploit that, but at the same time, "I wanted to do something a little different." So she made Jared, her leading male character, a San Diego County llama rancher. "He still has all the attributes of a cowboy, yet I was able to put my own stamp on it." She gave him an adorable 5-yearold daughter and an ex-wife whose career as a flight attendant had engaged her more than had motherhood. Lacey, the 32-year-old heroine, was "the working manager of a mall-based hair salon," an occupation that enabled Wellington to milk her own haircutting experience. The story opens at the "Rockin' Ranch country music bar," where the inhibited heroine has gone to seek bachelor cowboys to participate in the mall's "Most Eligible Bachelor charity auction."

In March 1998, Wellington sold this story to the Kensington publishing com-

pany's new Precious Gem line. Kensington's unorthodox plan for marketing its Precious Gem books was to sell them only in Wal-Mart stores and price them at \$1.96. Wellington's work appeared on Wal-Mart's shelves in September 1998 under the title *Bachelor for Sale*. Behind its hot pink

cover, the pace of the action is swift. By page 9, Lacey has stumbled by accident into Jared's arms. The two wind up on a sheepskin rug, taking their clothes off, by page 113. "You're so wet, so hot," he whispers four pages later. They discuss using a condom, but both have had HIV tests, so she guides "his [unprotected] shaft to her

to their perfect little family," Lacey concludes in the second to the last paragraph. (In the last one, he's urging her to go back to bed with him.)

For a while, Wellington's career seemed as if it might move forward with similar speed. Before *Bachelor* was even published, Kensington gave Welling-

ton the go-ahead to write a second contemporary story, this one about the operator of a gourmet cookie shop in Coronado. And six months later, the Jove division of Berkeley Publishing bought Wellington's time-travel fantasy. In March 2000, it appeared under the name *Forever Rose* and the author threw herself into the task of promoting it.

Wellington loves this aspect of being a romance writer. When her Precious Gem books came out, she arranged visits to every Wal-Mart in the county. "It was a blast! They set me up at the front of the store, and I greeted everybody as they came in. I sold a lot of books." Wellington's private goal was to sell at least one book to a man at every appearance. She says she found "if I could get them to stand there for five minutes and listen to me, typically they would buy one."

With the appearance of *Forever Rose*, Wellington's promotional efforts grew even more elaborate. She created a brothel tour in the Gaslamp Quarter; organized Wyatt Earp walks.

Out of paper doilies, she fashioned page-corner-hugging bookmarks to which she affixed clear stickers bearing the words, "Escape, Explore, Imagine...Read! www.janetwellington.com." She printed up cards in which she invited readers to curl up with *Forever Rose* and a cup of tea. To the inside of each card, she stapled a shiny packet of chamomile, ready for steeping.

The publicity work did keep her away from writing, one factor Wellington cites in explaining why she hasn't sold anything since Forever Rose came out two years ago. Another was her decision to develop her own Learning Annex program: "How to Write Romance Novels That Sell." Wellington says she's given this class three times in the past two years. She dismisses the notion that her students might become her rivals. She thinks the genre is big enough to accommodate any author who's willing to work hard and persevere. "I honestly believe in my heart that there's plenty of business there," she says.

The mutual support that exists among the local romance writers, new and experienced, seems as much a hallmark of the genre as all the smoldering glances, hard thighs, and heaving breasts. In San Diego alone, at least ten critique groups hold regular meetings. For participants, the relationships they form in these groups can feel "like a marriage," attests Oceanside resident Judy Duarte.

Duarte has been a member of such a group for about five years. Early one recent Sunday morning, three of the four regular members piled into a booth at the Coco's restaurant just off Interstate 5 at Encinitas Boulevard. Both Duarte and Sylvia Mendoza had brought written material to share. The third woman, Chris Green, offered an excuse for coming empty-handed. An eighth-grade teacher at the Wilson Academy Middle School in City Heights, she explained that she was taking a professional class for which she'd had to write a paper the day before. "It's really been cutting into my time," she lamented.

"But normally you write a lot!" her colleagues reassured her.

Green (who uses "Crvstal" instead of Chris as her prenom de plume) might be a model for the cover of a romance book. She's 34, with pretty features and a head of strawberry-blond hair that tumbles down to the middle of her back. "My parents used to read romance. Even my dad," she says. As a teenager, she too got addicted to the genre and made her first attempt at contributing to it when she was 19. "I'll never submit [that manuscript] anywhere, but it was a good exercise," she says. Green got more serious about publishing five years ago, when she joined Duarte's critique group. Encouraged by the feedback from her fellow members, she's managed to sell four books. Three have been set within a little town that Green thinks of as part Mayberry, part Twilight Zone.

The last two years have also been encouraging ones for Mendoza. The mother of three children (ages 9 through 14), she worked for years as a freelance journalist before deciding to diversify into fiction. Her break in the romance realm came when she was selected to be one of the launching authors for a new line of books from Pinnacle called Encanto. The initial concept was for each Encanto volume to include English and Spanish translations of the same story. Mendoza produced two San Diego—based tales for this bulky format, before soaring paper costs made Pinnacle abandon it. Since then, Mendoza has landed a contract from Encanto to write three interconnected Englishonly books. The heroes of these books are all Mexican-Americans who go into the Navy. "The first one's a commander on a carrier, the second is a Blue Angels pilot, and the third is a SEAL."

Until last year, that left Duarte as the only member of the group who hadn't yet sold a book. She says her attitude toward this turn of events was philosophical. "Somebody's going to sell first. And it doesn't necessarily mean that anyone is better or more advanced. One of us will hit the *New York Times* best-seller list first, and maybe that will

be me."

Still, Duarte admits to feeling relief and excitement when a Silhouette Special Edition editor called on May 7,2001, to declare her intention of publishing Duarte's story about the love that develops between an incognito heiress and a Texas cow-



boy (who happens to be a single father). This book is scheduled to appear on local bookshelves next month. She got word of her second sale at the beginning of December and since then has been trying to bring another big idea to life. Duarte envisions writing a series of books to which she's given the working title "Logan's Heroes." The hero of each book would be a voung man from a troubled childhood who has grown up and made good after being mentored by a tenderhearted cop named Harry Logan. Scanning the proposal that Duarte brought with her on the recent Sunday morning, Green praised the Oceanside resident for remedying a shortcoming that had appeared in an earlier version. In response to Green's criticism, Duarte had come up with a satisfying explanation for why one of the heroes had committed arson as a youth. (She'd decided that he had burned the building where his evil stepfather had sold drugs.)

Green also gently suggested that Duarte might

cut a few of the references to coffee-drinking that Duarte had scattered through her sample chapter in a veiled effort to build sexual tension.

"Oh, I loved the coffee references!" Mendoza interjected.

"No, I think I may have overdone it," Duarte murmured.

Mendoza was working on a proposal aimed at Harlequin's newest line one that the women described as Chick Lit rather than Romance. "You know—your Bridget Jones's Diary-type book," Green explained.

Sensing opportunity, both Green and Mendoza were hoping to write books for the line, but in the proposal Mendoza was developing, she was having trouble juggling the multiple points of view she thought the editors wanted. After reading Mendoza's pages, Green offered several suggestions to help readers keep the characters straight, as well as praise for the way Mendoza's material was shaping up. "After the first few pages, the writing gets really clean and the pace is snappier," Green said.

Mendoza confessed that the vagueness of the publisher's guidelines for the new line still made her nervous. "It's pretty wide open."

"I think they want misadventures of the dating life," Green stated. "I think they want a quirky heroine who's searching for that job and that defining moment in her life that's going to shape her."

The subject of Harlequin's new line came up again in conversation one week later at a conference sponsored by the local chapter of the Romance Writers of America. Held at the Quality Inn in Mission Valley, this event drew about 50 women and 1 man. For the better part of a day, they sat at banquet tables strewn with chocolates wrapped in shiny foil. They complained to one another about their editors' slowness in replying to proposals. They speculated about how September's terrorist attacks and the subsequent war would affect the romance industry. Most felt confident that a heightened craving for escapism would help the business.

During a brief business meeting, the women applauded the jubilant announcements of two of their comrades of recent book sales. Then they settled in to listen to the speakers. First to take the podium was Linda Lael Miller, a plump, late-middle-aged, self-described "barn goddess" who lives on a remote Arizona ranch. The author of 60 novels that have spawned some 20 million books in print, Miller confided, "Seventy percent of the time I feel like an absolute beginner.... The struggle is renewed with each book."

Elda Minger faced the group next. Minger is a fortysomething L.A. resident with pale skin and long, straight dark hair that she wears parted down the middle. She talks fast in a low, mellifluous voice, and on this occasion she dressed all in black. Minger has a reputation for writing bold, provocative sex scenes, and the conference program made it sound as if she would pontificate on this topic. Instead, she offered a lively if rambling monologue that touched upon everything from medieval Japan to astrology. (The latter, she suggested, could provide any writer with "gorgeous, gorgeous archetypes.")

Last to speak was thin, blond Suzanne Forster, who has published close to 30 books over the past 17 years. "Go to what's burning in your soul, or you won't fuel a career," she counseled. "Core fantasies" within the romance genre included the "soul-mate fantasy," the "intimate-stranger fantasy," the Ugly Duckling fantasy, and tales of rags to riches. "These are the secret dreams or secret weapons that can turn an average story into a bestseller," she declared.

Christie Ridgway was among those who attended the day-long conference. Afterward, she judged it "excellent." She added, "I could listen to Elda Minger talk for hours. I could sit in a room, and she could just talk to me for days and days. She's so interesting!" Even when a conference features less-accomplished writers, "Sitting with a group of people and talking in general is so fun," Ridgway said. She loves discussing romance books with kindred spirits. "Because I don't really meet a lot of people in my other life who love romance the way I do."

Ridgway says it's gotten harder and harder for her to find the time to attend conferences. In order to produce the two to three books a year that she's been selling, she has to write every day, including weekends. Often, she logs an eighthour day both Saturday and Sunday. "The book is always there," she explains. "There's always something you can do." Still, she wants to continue gathering with her fellow writers even if she does one day become a permanent fixture on national best-seller lists.







Ridgway would appear to have at least a chance at joining them. She says she's now making as much money as when she was programming computers. She's winning book contracts on the strength of brief proposals. Her books have been published in 19 countries. Fans write her letters.

Still, Ridgway says she's almost afraid to make bestseller status a goal. "Too many elements are out of your control," she explains. "Too many things can happen. Say your book comes out September 11. How many copies are going to be sold? Boom!" The next book's orders will be based on the sales of the previous one. "Or you can discover too late — that everybody hates books set in the Gold Country. But you didn't know. You thought it was a good idea." In the end, she's concluded, "You just can't think about it too much. I think you've got to just write the best book you can at that moment."

She can't imagine ever leaving behind the romance field. "It's what I love," she explains, and its constraints have never bothered her. "I want to write about men and women who come to an understanding and build a love relationship. That speaks to me in my life." To those who would criticize the genre for being something less than literature, she points out, "It's called mass-market fiction for a reason. It's fiction that appeals to a mass number of people. It's storytelling. I'm not writing a book to show off my literary skills. But on the other hand, I don't try to dumb down my books ever; I use the vocabulary that I use in my daily life. And I'm a welleducated person."

Ridgway says she's never understood how anyone could denigrate romance. Romance writers believe in the union of one man and one woman. And Ridgway thinks when a man and woman come together, something greater than the two individuals results. She thinks that's how people become heroic in life, and she wonders how anyone could disparage it. "What part of 'one man, one woman, love, happy-everafter' don't they like?" It all sounds good to her. ■

"What?"



called minorities currently comprise 72 percent of the district's 143,000 students. Each Bible Student congregation was basically selfgoverning and elected its own elders and deacons.

After Russell's death in 1916, Joseph Rutherford took over as second president of the Watchtower Society. Under Rutherford's tenure, the writings of Charles Russell were discarded, and the Watch Tower Society became the central authority over all the congregations. In 1931, Rutherford

It's the Water

Liquid Art

ook at a map of the country and try to decide where to build a city the size of San Diego," says Robert Miller. "One of the last places you'd consider would be Southern California, because of its lack of a good water source."

Millar is an artist who has created several public artworks with water themes. The San Diego Water Authority chose him to create something for the lobby of its new offices in Kearny Mesa. Now the piece has been given an award by the Metropolitan Water District of

Southern California. "Liquid Art," a photo exhibition of all 20 award-

winners from five counties is on view in San Diego. Several, like Millar's, are fountains. One is an aquarium. Another is a 13-acre emergency-storage pond adjacent to Lake Hodges. In all, four award-winning pieces are in San Diego County

Millar's isn't typical publicfountain fare. Called "Water Drip Fountain" when it was a work-inprogress, it's called "untitled (an homage)" by the artist today. (The homage is to performance artist Chris Burden, Millar says.)

Initially Millar proposed pieces to the San Diego Water Authority that weren't fountains and didn't use water. But they declined them. The finished piece is a small pool that's shaped like a map of San Diego County. From a pipe 17 feet above the pool a single drop falls — every 20 seconds.

To a reporter's suggestion that Millar said to the Authority with this piece, "Well, here's your water, but not much," he agrees. "Yeah, it could be interpreted that way, and it was by them."

It took months for Millar to figure out how to make that water drip correctly. Is it fair to say that he needed to create a dripping faucet? That nobody else wants one, but he did? "Yes, although if your faucet drips, try observing it over two months," Millar says. "It'll drip more at times and less at other times. How do you control it? I talked to everyone from water engineers to physicists and finally solved the problem."

What does the drip sound like? The hidden mechanism that controls the drip is much louder than the drip itself, says Miller. "It's the click of a solenoid."

Public fountains are notoriously highmaintenance — or else they become planters after a few years. Hoping to spare his piece this fate, Millar has presented the Authority with a maintenance manual.

"Conceptually, I like the relationship between maintaining a fountain and maintaining a water system for the county," says Millar,

"and having to find the money for both"

The Water Conservation Garden by Jeri Deneen and Jon Powell in El Cajon is another of the local awardwinners. Completed in 1999, it features over 600 plant species as well as sculpture along its winding paths.

Lynn Susholtz and Aida Mancillas received an award for "Water Marks" in Mission Trails Regional Park. A 200-foot mosaic map of the San Diego River, it's made of all natural materials, including ceramic tiles in many shades of blue. Bronze information plaques tell the history of the people, plants, and animals who have lived along the river. The texts are in English, Spanish, Braille, and the language of the Kumeyaay.

Water is absent from this one. But, say Susholtz, "referring to the history refers to the water." That "continuing element" has made it possible for all of us to live here.

"Viewage" (rhymes with "sewage") is the name of Paul Hobson's piece — the emergency holding pond below a ridge of homes overlooking Lake Hodges. A project of the San Diego Water Utilities Department, it was completed in 1997. "Nearby homeowners were worried that it would be unsightly," says Hobson, who was given the task of designing something that would blend with the surrounding landscape.

Nearly the size of two Target stores, it's 210,000 square feet. Made of 550 concrete slabs, it was poured in checkerboard style. Each square, while still wet, was sprinkled with color "hardeners" that Hobson says he used

like pixels

"We chose green, brown, and purple, because they match the natural colors in the area. If you look, you'll see that Southern California scrub has a real purple tinge to it. It's kind of a surprise to me. But it was definitely one of the colors to use."

Hobson believes his design is best appreciated from the air. He has seen it more than once from a small plane and photographed it as he hung out of its open window. "From the air you see nature, a pixilated view of nature, then nature again."

A giant pump on a boom was used to pour the concrete, but the color hardeners were applied by hand — sown like seeds from bags by "dozens of guys walking along in rubber boots." Can people walk around in the empty pond today? "They're not supposed to, but skateboarders use it," says Hobson. "They like it because there's no joint where the sloped sides meet the floor. It was a great engineering feat by the city engineers."

Manzanita Shrubs are starting to bloom this month in the foothill areas of the Cleveland National Forest. The various manzanitas, characterized by smooth, reddish bark and tough, leathery leaves, bear myriad tiny, white to pinkish-white, urnshaped blossoms. Large (decadesold) manzanitas can be seen around

Julian and in parts of the Cuyamaca Mountains. Along the coast a similar, but less attractive manzanita thrives - mission manzanita.

Jupiter is the most prominent starlike object in the early-evening sky this month. At dusk it shines like a great unblinking eye near the top of the sky. Jupiter's Galilean satellites, the four largest and brightest moons circling the planet, can be easily observed using equipment as simple as firmly supported, high-power binoculars. Discovered by Galileo in 1610, these satellites noticeably change their configuration from night to night as they swing around the planet.



To Garry Wills and Ovid Demaris's profile of Jack Ruby and Jean Stafford's eccentric dialog with Marguerite Oswald, A Mother in History, Mallon adds this portrait of witness Ruth Paine and a life admirably lived in the face of national tragedy. The Oswalds shared Mrs. Paine's house during the months prior to November 22, 1963, when Lee left quietly for work with the rifle he'd secretly kept in the Paines' garage. ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Thomas Mallon was born in 1951 and grew up in a middle-class community in Long Island. He did his undergraduate work at Brown University and received his Ph.D. in English from Harvard University. His dissertation, on the British poet Edmund Blunden (1896-1974), best known for poems he wrote during World War I, was published in 1983 as Edmund Blunden. About that dissertation, Mr. Mallon said, on the day that we talked, "It was a good experience. It betrayed that my interest, even back then, was as much history as literature. Because

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR: "How old were you when President Kennedy was shot?"

"I had just turned 12."

"What do you remember about that day?"

"Almost everything. I was out from school. I was home sick, or at least pretending to be sick. I had an indulgent mother who let us be absent probably more often than she should have. And I remember that my uncle was visiting and that my mother had gone out shopping. I was playing chess with my uncle. I still have that chess set. And I remember my mother coming into the house with grocery bags and just dropping them. She had two bags and she just dropped them. And she told my uncle, 'Put on the television.' As a result, one slight difference between me and other people I grew up with was that I remember very well what was the half hour or so left between knowing that the president had been shot and finding out that he was dead. Whereas most of my classmates were at school that day and never learned about it until later, because the announcement didn't come until later that the president was dead.

"But I remember all this very vividly. Vividly. I can remember we were watching NBC. I remember Frank McGee, the Oklahoma man who was the announcer who was handling the cov-



erage — at least some of which I've looked at in connection with *Mrs. Paine's Garage*, and it's extraordinarily primitive; the bulkiness of the microphone, the difficulty with which they shift to the live report from somewhere and everybody is smoking right at the anchor desk. It looks so antique. Most of them did not have that polished, blow-dried look that we see today."

"They looked like newsmen — reporters."

"Yes, and most of them, of course, were. They had come out of the newspaper business, or they'd been in radio before television. But I remember this very, very vividly, and I remember I was aware of Ruth Paine from the very start. My father's paper was *The New York World Telegram Sun*. That was the paper he brought home. It was a Scripps-Howard paper, kind of a middle-brow paper, one of the newspapers that disappeared a few years later in New York. I read everything and watched television."

"And you probably watched television all that weekend."

"Oh very much, for sure. And then, when the first wave of books came out in the next year — the Warren Report itself, and then in 1967, William Manchester's book and Jim Bishop's book — I bought all of those books with my high school allowance. And, in fact, for this book, I prepped with those books, before I went down and interviewed Ruth in the summer of 2000. I was getting ready to do it mostly in the National Archives, reading the documents there, but I was going back through a lot of the Kennedy-assassination literature, and I was very aware that I was reading these books that I'd had for over 30 years, and some of them said, 'Tommy Mallon,' on the flyleaf; I was very proud to own them. And Ruth said to me when we were doing an interview, she said something like, 'You were getting ready to do this all your life.' And I realized that I had, in a way, been getting ready to do this, all my life."

"She liked you, Ruth did."

"I let her speak for herself. I think this was an exhausting experience for her, emotionally and otherwise. She was wonderful to

me. I think that she was very reluctant to do this, but once she did it, she was forthcoming, and none of this was easy for her. I have a great deal of admiration for her. She tried to do her best. I quote her in the book as saying, 'I've done my level best to honor history.' I think she was responsible, when it came to all the investigations. Ruth is a very modest person, and she was wondering what my interest in her was — as opposed to my being just one more person digging into the Kennedy assassination.

"I said I wasn't interested in an evidentiary approach to the crime. My book — it's pretty clear from the outset that I'm essentially a believer in the Warren Commission. I think Oswald did it. I think he did it alone. That's not to say there are no questions to be asked, but that's definitely the premise of my book. And what interested me was not reinvestigating the assassination, which I didn't have a desire to do and that I was not really equipped to do. I was interested in Ruth as a person. Particularly interested in how somebody dealt with a life experience like that. I'm not sure that many people would have gotten through this as well as she did, a life convulsed in that way."

I said that Mr. Mallon's focus on Mrs. Paine was not unlike other books he's written, in which a cataclysmic event is seen from the point of view of someone who is not central to that event

event.

"You're exactly right. It sort of has become the whole pattern of my writing. I never set out to do it. But something clearly has drawn me to that perspective. In fact, you know, I had an essay collection out about a year ago, *In Fact: Essays on Writers and Writing.* There's a piece in that book called 'A Boy of No Importance.' It was one of the very first things I ever published. I was in my mid-20s. I was still a graduate student when I wrote it. It came out in 1978. It was about a young man named Edward Shelley. Edward Shelley was the office boy at Oscar Wilde's publisher.

lisher.

"And Edward Shelley got involved in the Wilde scandal.

Wilde took a fancy to him, and Edward Shelley was this very working-class, aspiring boy, who aspired to learning and being a writer. And he wound up testifying against Wilde at the trials. He was very different from the kind of street-boy prostitutes that gave the bulk of the testimony. He was a very odd, tragic figure. All of the contemporary accounts talk about how nerve-wracked he was on the stand. Something about this story appealed to me. I went off in search of it. It was the first substantial article that I published. I realized, thinking about this recently, that in a way there's a direct line from that article to this little book on Ruth

Paine.

"I was interested in Ruth as a person.... I'm not sure that many people would have gotten through this as well as she did, a life convulsed in that way." "Again, it was somebody who was unwittingly caught up in a catastrophe, didn't expect to find themselves in this lurid, or temporarily lurid, situation. And then receded into obscurity again. And I traced the rest of his life; he lived up until 1951. And so some of that clearly is in there. My best-known book is probably a novel called *Henry and Clara*, which is about a couple who were President Lincoln's

guests in his box at the Ford Theater on the night that he was shot. The connection to Ruth there is obvious. In fact, it was after that book came out that I first approached her and said, 'I'd like to write about you, not a fiction, but a nonfiction work.'

Mr. Mallon's old, old book on diaries, I said, printed some of the diaries of minor people.

"Yes. That was the first sort of real trade book I published. And there is an element of what we're talking about there, too, I

think. A lot of the diaries in that book are not necessarily the diaries of famous people like Virginia Woolf. But there are a lot of obscure people in there, ordinary people, who kept diaries. These diaries interested me because their keepers were very good about talking about the times they lived in, or they were able to show their character on the page very vividly."

We talked, then, about the Paines and their lives during the 1960s when Ruth Paine met the Oswalds and took them into her home. "They were really American aristocrats of a sort," Mr. Mallon said. "Michael Paine has this very distinguished lineage that takes him back to Ralph Waldo Emerson, and you got the Quaker on one side, the Unitarian on the other. And to put these people in suburban Dallas, in the fall of 1963, I think just living there before anything had happened with the assassination was a rough experience on both of them, because they were such fish out of water. These were two very exotic people for Dallas in those days. Not that Dallas was completely devoid of Unitarians and Quakers. But, certainly, on the street on which they lived, the Paines really stuck out. And it's no wonder that locally some people looked askance at them at the time of the assassination and thought they were in some way guilty. But I think, in the end, except for very fringy, really way-out conspiracy types, most people realized when they saw the extent of Ruth's cooperation with investigators that the Paines were perfectly upstanding people.

"Of course, once the Paines were there in Dallas they would be the kind of people who would run into an odd character like Lee Harvey Oswald. And Ruth Paine would meet him at a party held at the home of somebody she had done madrigal singing with. It sort of makes sense after a while."

I said that there seemed to be a sort of noblesse oblige about the Paines, both Ruth and Michael.

Mr. Mallon did not disagree. "I think that's very much a part of Ruth and Michael. They're very idealistic. It's very funny in a way.

I have a lot of admiration for Ruth, but I wouldn't say I've ever been totally comfortable in her presence, because I am so aware of her as so different from me. I'm aware of her as somebody who is so constantly looking to do the right thing."

"Ruth Paine's your mother's age, isn't she?"

"A little bit younger. My mother is in her late 70s. Ruth will be 70 this year. She's a very youthful 70. But you know, anybody who looks at me would look at me as this sort of tweedy-looking academic type. But I always feel almost flashy around Ruth. She's a very smart person, very. But she's somebody who — as Thoreau would say, 'lived deliberately.' Somebody who is trying to find a purpose in life, trying to find a way to live a life that isn't simply reactive, trying to do some good in the world. I think that one of the things that interested me too was the collision of lightness and darkness."

We talked then about the title. "It is an odd title," Mr. Mallon admitted. "What I saw was so poignant. I mean, that night when Ruth goes out there to check the garage and notices that the light is on. And figures that Lee had been out in the garage because she knew he had some things stored out there, she didn't think much of it, didn't think anything of it, really. And then went to bed. And I just think how, as the hours were passing in that night, with the Kennedys in the hotel in Fort Worth, getting ready to come to Dallas in the morning, Oswald is in one of the bedrooms with Marina, lying awake for most of the night. And Oswald is knowing what he's going to do in the morning. Ruth is gone to sleep for the night. And in that garage you have two things. You have Oswald's rifle, which Ruth does not know is there — she doesn't know he has a rifle, doesn't know it's wrapped up in a blanket and just a few feet away from there, you have this metal file box of papers that the Dallas police are going to see, without a warrant, tomorrow. And in that box of papers are all the things I discovered when I saw copies of them in the National Archives. When I met Ruth, she showed me the originals.

"What is in that box are all the things that make Ruth Ruth — these heartfelt letters to family and friends, personal reflections, even a prayer that she had composed, and it seems to me that sitting there in the garage, as the hours ticked, through the night, you have these two things that represent this collision of good and evil. And the collision of Ruth with Oswald.

"I went to Dallas to that garage, I stood in that garage. The Paines, of course, moved away many years ago, but I sort of talked my way into the house, with the current owner. He was a very sweet fellow. He let me in; he even let me take pictures. I'd written him in advance. And I told him what I was up to and so forth."

"Did you send him a copy of a book?"

"I don't know if I sent them a book. I know I sent them photographs of the house that the Warren Commission had taken. I thought they might be interested in them. When I visited the house I said, to the current owner, 'Did you know the history of this house when you bought it?' And he said, 'We found out at the closing.' And he said that occasionally people drive by and look at it. But I did not put all this in the book because I didn't want to become a character. I do appear in the first person in the latter part of the book, but I didn't really want to become a character. But I had such a strong reaction. I was so tense after being in that garage that I walked away from that, and I was about to go call a taxi, and my muscles in my neck started to tense up. The next morning I was in such awful shape I couldn't move my head. I was just locked up between my shoulders and my neck, just agony, just pure muscle tension. I was in a hotel in Dallas. The woman at the desk at the hotel said, 'I can get you a cab to take you to a local emergency room; maybe they can give you a muscle relaxant.' Which is what they did. And I found myself at Parkland Hospital, where both President Kennedy and Lee Harvey Oswald died. But I didn't put that in the book because it just seemed too much a self-display or something.

I said that I was not surprised that Mr. Mallon had such a strong reaction. "After all," I went on to say, "for such a long time you

had lived all this as if it were your own life."

"I did. I really waited for a number of years. I maintained this kind of friendly connection and correspondence with Ruth, but when she actually said yes after four years, I was quite surprised, and I didn't want to let the

opportunity get away. I didn't want her to change her mind."

Did Mr. Mallon think that John Kennedy Jr.'s death caused Mrs. Paine to reconsider?

"I actually asked her about it, and she didn't say yes and she didn't say no, as I remember. I think it contributed to it. I think that one of the things that has been a terrible burden for Ruth over the years, although she's worn it as lightly as anybody can wear it, is that from time to time, events occur that just cause all of this to churn up again. I would not be surprised if Jacqueline Kennedy's death, several years before, was another time like that.'

For many Americans, I said, the Kennedys became like family members. People felt a closeness to them.

"I think that's true. People had never known a 'first family' like that. We hadn't had this sort of daily fascination. They were like film stars. Of course, if you look at the movie magazines of the day, you'd see that the Kennedy family often would displace Liz Taylor and Debbie Reynolds, because the movie-magazine editors would say, 'Well, let's put these people in there, they're more glamorous than who we're dealing with.'"

That the Kennedys had small children, I said, seemed to allow

people more easily to identify with them.

"Yes. Ruth definitely had that identification with Mrs. Kennedy because she had a little girl and a little boy. The little girl was a couple of years older than the boy. And it was very similar in some ways. One of the very first things that she and Marina talked about while they were spending that half hour, waiting to know what was going to happen, whether the president would live or not, was 'What a terrible thing for Mrs. Kennedy, what a terrible thing for those chil-

"This has never been published in America, that picture. I was astonished — I owe this to The New Yorker, where a piece of the book appeared last month. The New Yorker was looking for pictures to run with the excerpt that they published. I talked about possible sources. And I said, 'Boy, I'd love someday to find the Life magazine pictures that were taken of the house on Friday night and Saturday morning.' Time-Life rather jealously guards the photograph archive. I just talked about this with the photo researcher. And she discovered that the man who took the pictures was very much alive — Alan Grant, he was a freelancer. He had the pictures. I saw that picture in the kitchen, that's on the cover of the book, and I was just chilled to see it."

"It's such a period piece," I said, "the bottles of Tab, the bottles of 7-Up, the washing machine."

"Exactly. And in fact, those groceries that are on the counter, I would bet you, were the groceries that Oswald had helped Ruth carry in that Thursday night. And the thing that really took my breath away was that picture that is in the left-hand corner. There's the newspaper that says, 'Stage Set for Kennedy Visit.' You know it's yesterday's newspaper.

"Ruth had never seen the picture. And that was one more thing that she had to go through. I just sent her a copy of the picture. I wanted to make sure who the child was, that it was June and not one of Ruth's kids. So I needed Ruth to identify the people in the photo, or the baby at least."

I said that I didn't know how much Mr. Mallon knew about women's clothing, but in this photograph both Marina and Ruth are wearing a similar blouse, with a Peter Pan collar.

"And the skirts," Mr. Mallon said, "look as if they were made out of a similar pattern."

"I think that they were. It was a three-yard skirt that was gathered and placed on a waistband. This skirt, in the 1950s, was a typical high school home-economics project. It's an amazing photo-

"Ruth's face in this picture is clearly distressed. And she's actually — I know the reader can't know it seeing it — but I know that she's looking right at the garage in that photograph. I don't know if you saw The New Yorker that ran a part of this; they had a couple more pictures."

"Christmas," I said, "got in the way. I did not read it."

"If you've still got it, it's the December 3 issue. They had a couple more pictures, and one of them is Marina hanging clothes on the clothesline, again, the morning after the assassination, and that clothesline is still there. The man who has the house now, they've got a little kid, and they still hang the baby clothes on it."

"No wonder your neck hurt. Standing there with that."

"Exactly. So that was ...'

... Mrs. Paine's garage.

"Exactly. But, this book is positively my last word on the subject of presidential assassinations."



Roam-O-Rama

A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond • By Jerry Schad

San Diego County's "big" Black Mountain (not the smaller one looming above Rancho Peñasquitos) rises gently to an elevation of 4051 feet outside Ramona. A fire-lookout tower once stood on Black Mountain's summit, taking full advantage of a panoramic and certainly unique — vista furnished by the mountain's strategic central location within the county.

Hikers, bikers, runners, equestrians,



and four-wheel drivers have public access to Black . Mountain's summit via a winding fire road up the southwest flank — though motorized vehicles will get no closer than one mile (or more distance if the road is impacted by weather) from the top. Unquestionably, the late-winter period is perfect for an exercise-oriented trek up this road. The air's clear and cool through March, and the dominant chaparral vegetation hereabouts is dressed up in its best spring-green foliage.

To reach the base of Black Mountain, first head for Pamo Road, using either Haverford Road off Highway 78 north of Ramona or Seventh Street (becomes Elm Street) north from "downtown" Ramona. As you drive north on Pamo Road, your car pitches deeply downhill into the sublime and isolated Pamo Vallev. Continue north in the valley to where the pavement ends and further 1.3 miles to a dirt-road intersection on the right. Forest Road 12S07. You may park near this intersection, or else (using a high-clearance vehicle only) drive 1.5 rutty miles uphill to a wide intersection where Black Mountain fire road forks left. Parking at this upper starting point (elevation 1645 feet) requires that a National Forest Adventure Pass be displayed on your car.

From the upper starting point, 5.6 miles of moderate and almost unrelenting ascent lie ahead. As you climb toward the mountain's broad summit, scrubby chamise chaparral gradually yields to sparse Engelmann oak woodland, and finally to planted groves of coniferous trees (mostly

Coulter pines). The Organ Valley Research Natural Area, a square mile of oak-dotted ravines and slopes in Cleveland National Forest designated for special protection, lies east of the road. You may notice a hiker's entryway into this natural area 3.3 miles up the road. At 3.8 miles you'll pass a perennial spring and fire-fighting reservoir, where horses and dogs can fill their bellies

The road ends 5.4 miles up, and a final rough 0.2 mile on bulldozed former roadway lets hikers reach the fire-tower site. Concrete steps, footings, and a cistern remain amid a surviving ground-covering carpet of vinca, or periwinkle. Using fingers and toes you can launch yourself atop the cistern. There you can spin your head around for a 360-degree panorama not available elsewhere: rolling pasturelands in Mesa Grande a mile or two north and east, and range after range of mountains in every direction except west, where the cobalt-blue or sparkling silver ocean reveals itself on the clearest days.

There are also nautical exhibits, ship carpenters, model building, ships in bottles, woodcarvers, and a complete research library.

The museum is located at 1306 North Harbor Drive, along the Embarcadero at the corner of North Harbor Drive and Ash Street; 619-234-9153. (DOWNTOWN)

San Diego Museum of Man, the renovation of the museum's west wing is now officially open to the public, housing the new anthropology exhibit "Footsteps through Time: Four Million Years of Human Evolution." This permanent exhibit features five galleries filled with "more than a hundred touchable replicas of early humans, primates, and futuristic cyborgs (part human, part machine)." The exhibit offers an indepth look at human evolution.



The Ebullience of Non-Gypsies

Maybe you'll like it, maybe you won't.

iolinist Anthea Kreston and cellist Jason Duckles have been familiar to La Jolla Chamber Music Society audiences for a few years now. With the youthful Avalon String Quartet, of which they constituted half, they gave

impressive performances of Beethoven, Janáček, and Hugo Wolf in a "Discovery Series" concert (the Beethoven — the second "Razumovsky" — is available on

the Avalon's recording, *Live at Caramoor*). The Avalon returned here in SummerFest 2000 with a breathtaking "Death and the Maiden," and on the same program Kreston and Duckles shifted hats to assume their roles as two thirds of the Amelia Piano Trio (the other third is pianist Jonathan Yates). Both the Avalon and the Amelia struck me as among the most exciting of the plethora of terrific new chamber groups we have been hearing over the past decade (the Avalon was formed in 1995, the Amelia two years later). It was therefore a highly anticipated pleasure to hear the Amelia on this season's "Discovery Series" at Sherwood Auditorium — and in fact the quality of the playing was, if anything, even more commanding than before.

I did feel a bit disappointed when I found out that the Amelia had programmed the Ravel Trio, which is the work they performed some 18 months ago at SummerFest. I had been carried away by the volcanic passion and lyrical expressiveness of their earlier performance, but wouldn't it have been more interesting to hear them in some other repertoire (such as the Brahms C Minor Trio, which they have just recorded so brilliantly)? As it turned out, however, their most recent traversal of the Ravel work had all the freshness and sense of revelation of their previous one, and perhaps to an even greater degree. On this occasion I was more acutely aware of their subtle reinterpretations of this well-known score — nothing gross or eccentric, but a bit of phrasing here, a little rhythmic underlining there, an unexpected wash of color on a single note or two, all adding up to a fascinating and invigorating renewal of the music, as if I were hearing it for the first time (and

not just by the Amelia Trio, but by anybody).

I had a similar experience in listening to the Amelia's performance of Beethoven's Opus 11 Trio. First of all, it's unusual these days to hear the Opus 11 in the composer's alternate version

for violin, cello, and piano. During the past two or three seasons in San Diego, I can recall two performances (and very good ones) of the version with clarinet, which

seems to have become the preferred one with musicians and audiences. There is no doubt that the combination of clarinet, cello, and piano produces a dazzling range of diverse tone colors, and that in the third movement especially, a series of ingenious variations on a theme from a recent comic opera by Joseph Weigl, the clarinet's timbres and articulations make it ideally suited to conveying the sense of uproarious (and sometimes vulgar) fun Beethoven drew from this lively little tune.

In contrast, the version with violin, while less diverse in color, gives the listener a greater sense of the work's structural solidity and inventiveness. Listening to the way the Amelia played the music, one could not deny that the Opus 11 has the right to be counted along with the "standard" Beethoven piano trios, instead of being shunted off to the side as a delectable freak. And if the finale sounded somewhat less like a low Viennese comic opera, to make up for it the slow movement radiated a serene beauty, at once simple and profound, that revealed it as one of Beethoven's masterpieces in this form. The three musicians seemed in total accord as to interpretation, here and throughout, and their pleasure in working with each other was patent. The technical proficiency, the exquisite focus of the string sound, the breadth, nobility, and delicacy of the pianist's contribution (which reminded me poignantly of the late David Golub), the grace and intensity of the singing lines, the emotional sincerity and truth of all the playing (yet without any breach of decorum or style) - you just don't hear better chamber music performances than

the young American, Adam B. Silverman. This was a three-movement trio named "Sturm" (a title which, the printed program curiously indicated, the composer has chosen to copyright). Silverman's own program notes, an engaging farrago about Viennese wine, hangovers, "Sturm und Drang, and free tickets, along with some touching wishes and apprehensions ("I hope you like Sturm...maybe you'll like it, maybe you won't"), provided no useful counsel as to how to listen to the music. Maybe none was needed. What I heard was thoroughly accessible, on both a sensual and a structural level, and the Amelia's impassioned playing helped to make the work an exceptionally pleasurable one, with discernible (and sometimes ravishing) melodic motifs, a rich harmonic vocabulary, and an inebriating (there's that Viennese wine) rhythmic pulse. The music's stylistic ancestors seemed to include Fauré and Chausson on the one hand (for the textures, the harmonies, and the superbly idiomatic instrumental

writing), and John Adams on the other (for the relentless drive and dynamic repetitiveness) — an odd marriage, but a successful one. The composition was not without its faults.

Its three movements were too much like each other: each of them more or less a perpetuum mobile, with ceaseless rapid triplets in the first and last movements, and ceaseless groups of four, at a slower pace, in the middle one, through which an occasional soaring lyrical phrase made its way, like a vast-winged bird over a pullulating tropical rain forest. A good device once, but not three times in a row. Internally, the lack of structurally and emotionally contrasting sections left the mind without reference points, so that the length of each movement seemed arbitrary. The supererogatory lighting effects (each movement was associated with a different color) were crude and naive, an inheritance from George Crumb that ought to have been rejected. But these de-

fects are likely to be signs of youth, rather than of native musical disposition. Silverman is surely a composer to be watched.

For their encore — given in response to the audience's standing ovation — the Amelia Trio did something unprecedented. Instead of offering a piece in which all three musicians could participate equally, cellist Duckles and pianist Yates gracefully retired to the background, merely providing accompaniment to violinist Kreston's



sensational performance of that virtuoso fiddler's showstopper, the Csárdás by Vittorio Monti. I have to say that I have never heard this magnificent piece of pseudo-gypsy fluff played better. From her playing in the Amelia Trio and the Avalon Quartet (in which latter, by the way, her instrument was the viola), I knew she was a chamber musician of the first water. But I did not expect she was also a soloist of the Heifetz-Milstein-Shaham-Vengerov calibre, whose instrumental mastery and musical instincts could make even a mere bagatelle thrill the soul and stir the senses to a frenzy. What was most fabulous about this performance was its sly humor, its mock gypsy slides and droops, its melodramatic pauses and changes of pace, all of which recalled — with the slightest poker-face touch of irony — the heart-on-thesleeve exaggerations of real gypsy bands.

I wish Alice Kearns had been there to delight in this playing. Alice, a long-time supporter of the Chamber Music Society and especially its "Discovery Series," died last July, and the Amelia's concert, underwritten by Rita and Richard Atkinson, was given in her honor. Of all the admirable traits of that remarkable woman, her sense of humor was one of the most prominent; no one would have responded to Kreston's fiery and amusing Csárdás with more appreciative zest. Her ebullient spirit pervaded the whole wonderful concert. \blacksquare

hotography has always been hooked on celebrity. Less than two decades after its invention, in the 1850s the French photographer Gaspard Félix Tournachon, known as Nadar, was making portraits of the most famous

personalities of Second Empire France, including George Sand, Victor Hugo, and Charles Baudelaire, who, though happy to be photographed, believed photog-

raphy could never be a fine art because it was bound to a "slavish imitation" of reality. Photography's archiving of what's visually there made it a new taxonomic tool. It was also a kind of vi-

Cindy Sherman became famous in the late 1970s with Untitled Film Stills, portraits of herself dolled up in costumes and wigs to make herself look like characters out of B movies and film noir. Playing the sultry dame or vixen or girl next door, she tantalized viewers with the theatricality of celebrity and the mechanics of glamour. She depended on our savvy willingness to appreciate layered representations of the self and to play along with her authenticity-versus-illusion game. Often her "character" seemed caught by surprise, though Sherman knew that we knew that she knew there was no candor at all. In a 1979 image, we come upon her sitting at a garden table, a platinum blond floozy in negligee painting her toenails, looking up from behind dark glasses.

She's a celebrity, any celebrity, most of all the kind we sometimes fancy ourselves to be. Later, in the 1990s, Sherman made portraits of herself armored in artificial body parts, then she began to photograph disjointed mockup female bodies

made of prostheses. These pictures owed a lot to the work of the surrealist Hans Bellmer, who in the 1930s used dolls and mannequins to represent deranged,

grotesquely fetishistic female anatomies.

The Sherman picture is on view at the Museum of Photographic Arts in Double Vision: Photographs from the Strauss Collection, along with a Bellmer in which plastic, varicolored molds of a female head, hand, pelvis, and abdomen are loosely and incoherently joined. The exhibition ties together other artists. The trumpeted colors in Tina Barney's big images of tense, upper-middle-class domestic scenes are played off against Nicholas Nixon's subdued black-and-white group portraits of four sisters. Barney's pictures seem a blast of candor, but they were made with a bulky, large-format camera, which requires careful setups and long exposure times. The scenes we feel a bit embarrassed to happen upon have, in fact, been carefully staged. Nixon, too, has used a largeformat camera to make 26 portraits, one each year from 1975 to 2000, of his wife and her three sisters. While the group arrangement never changes, we see the changing relations among

the sisters and between them and the camera. The series is an ongoing act of witness to the way time writes itself into the skin and to a certain fearless handsomeness of middle age.

There are other, more provocative corre-

spondences. The German photographer Thomas Ruff has pursued a project that in its different way continues one that his predecessor, August Sander, began long ago. Between the wars, Sander set himself the task of making a sociological com-





pendium of Germans from different walks of life. He photographed, in mostly formal poses, farmers, tradespeople, businessmen, and laborers. Sometimes he shot them in their context or with the materials of their work. He intended to make thousands of these and collect them in a series titled "Man in the 20th Century," but only the first volume, "Face of Our Time," appeared in 1929. In 1934 the Nazis banned it, seized the negatives, and destroyed the plates; Sander's diversity of physiognomic types didn't conform to the Reich's vision of Aryan homogeneity.

Sander's project was to state and to reveal: character, personality, social station, and the relationship of the body to work. Ruff's stark head shots of young Germans, in glossy color against a white background, reveal as little as possible about the subjects beyond their age. The stripped-down authenticity turns each into a mask that gives away nothing. The bland mug-shot format — the pictures look as if they were made in a freezer - is unsettling because it offers a strikingly complete image of affectlessness. Ruff doesn't want his portraits to be readable and seems not really interested in the nature of his subjects. His mission is in large part theoretical. He wants to demonstrate how portraiture, far from being the reliable sociological register Sander envisioned, is at

once authentic and artificial it projects genuine illusions. It's too bad that the three representative Ruff portraits are accompanied only by a rather nondescript landscape Sander did after the war. If you're interested in Sander's enormous project and achievement, check out the monograph in the bookstore.

In the early 1970s Lee Friedlander, one of our best photographers, got his hands on plates made by E.J. Bellocq that depicted the prostitutes of New Orleans' Storyville district early in the last century. The prints Friedlander made

showed Bellocq to have been an insinuating portrait artist with complicated erotic relationships to his subjects. (Louis Malle's 1978 movie, Pretty Baby, drew on these materials, with Keith Carradine playing Bellocq.) A picture from 1912 shows a woman standing at the foot of a bed dressed only in black stockings and high-heeled mules. Her body possesses a voluptuous ease; there's no irony in the display, neither on her nor on Bellocq's part. The irony gapes at us from the condition of the print: the woman's face, as in several of the Storyville pictures, has been

scratched out, no one knows

Though Cindy Sherman is a shy, quiet-spoken person, her pictures have played loudly in the art scene. Similar noise was raised in the 1980s over Doug and Mike Starn, identical twins who made photographs of old masters' paintings, which they roughed up, crudely cropped, and pinned to the walls of exhibition spaces, remastering the imagery, so to speak. Their amiably hangdog pictures didn't have the insider coyness of Sherman's work. To judge by the recent portrait of

Doug in Double Vision, the Starn Twins have become a little less angular though no less ironic. Doug's portrait is antiqued, its textures scoured, and its tones soaked with sepia running to charcoal black to make it look like a 19th-century studio product. The image has a crafty, self-aware elegance, but Doug's pose is absurdist, antic glamour-boy stuff; head resting on hand, he stares moodily into the distance, with the intention, I suppose, of deconstructing the corniest cliché of portraiture. How different is Paul Strand's wary, respectful, probing image of a young Egyptian woman made in 1959. As always, Strand makes the camera eye seem like a curious, benevolent visitor, one of the Magi.

My preoccupations notwithstanding, Double Vision isn't made up entirely of portraits. The most violently lovely thing in the show is the American Roman de Salvo's 1999 Hvdrant Fire, which makes a fireplug look like a flame-generating engine. And Candida Höfer's hard-surfaced contemporary image of a reading room, at first off-putting because of its sterile décor, begins to look like a haunted place, as if the egret-shaped reading lamps, severe ladder, and floorto-ceiling bookshelves might come alive late at night and perform a mad dance, just as the celibate, self-controlled Shakers would blow off sexual energy by dancing, without physical contact, until they dropped. ■

Love's Ashes

"We communicate only too well in our silence, in what is unsaid."

iagonal streaks of light sculpt an eerie eminence at the Cassius Carter: a large box, maybe four feet by four feet, looms centerstage. If it were an obsidian rectangle, instead of a giant maple square, it could be the monolith in 2001: A Space Odyssey. For the rest of the stage,

designer Robin Sanford Roberts employs razor-sharp right angles and a parquet floor. There is nothing round, gentle — human — about the spectacle.

When Harold Pinter's *Betrayal* begins, like dismantling a Rubik's cube, actors take the box apart. Smaller wooden configurations become tables, chairs, beds. The set works like Pinter's play, which follows the arc of an affair and breaks down the feelings and motives of the characters from 1968 to 1977.

Robert hates the modern novels he publishes. Jerry's a literary agent. In 1968, Jerry and Robert's wife, Emma, become lovers, and Jerry swears that their relationship will always be pure and discreet. He's as giddy about concealment as he is about her. He'd better be, because when Robert married Emma, Jerry was Robert's best man, and they remain loyal friends.

If *Betrayal* were linear, unfolding from point A to B, it could bore you to tears. Robert, Jerry, and Emma say little, even when excited. They'd rather discuss a jaunt to Torcello than how they feel. And their literary backgrounds produce shop talk, not insights about the art. But Pinter is more

concerned with what they don't say. And to spotlight their verbal lapses, he wrote *Betrayal* backwards. It begins two years past the end of Jerry and Emma's affair and concludes, nine scenes later, at the beginning, when Jerry makes a pass at Emma.

Running in reverse, *Betrayal* moves from cold to warm, from love's ashes to initial sparks. And dramatic irony reigns throughout. Knowing the outcome, the

audience runs ahead of the characters who, as they become youthful, grow in hope and optimism. The structure reveals how transitory vows can be, and ideals, and much about the trio. But the title also refers to an unseen, ever-present figure: the ultimate betrayer, time.

In a disturbing way, however, the characters defeat time. The reversed structure creates the impression that they must relive their lives again, and again — like boxes in Chinese boxes, and like Robin Roberts's set at the Carter. They're caught in a cycle of repetition. Just when they're about to escape, in 1977, suddenly it's 1968. They begin to betray each other, and themselves, again.

"You and I, the characters which grow on a page," Pinter said in a speech, "most of the time we're inexpressive, giving little away, unreliable, elusive, evasive, obstructive, unwilling. But it's out of these attributes that a language arises. A language, I repeat, where under what is said, another thing is being said."

Commentators label this under-language, and Pinter's famous "pauses," as a "failure of communication." Pinter says no: "We communicate only too well in our silence, in what is unsaid." People use speech, he claims, as a mask, as "desperate, rearguard attempts to keep ourselves to ourselves."

Pinter said he knows only what his characters reveal to him, which means about as much as we know ("I don't plan them at all... I just find them, and therefore I have to find out about them"). So he inspects them, like a detective, to discover clues about who they are and what they feel. This sleuthing rarely happens with words. What the body suggests, where the eyes gaze, or avoid, what ticks or gestures suggest: these become partial illuminators.

Roberts's remarkable set has another use. The wood blocks serve as shapes of objects, without detail that could detract from the actors. But Karen Carpenter's direction is a puzzle. More often than not, when the

actors reach a pause, nothing happens. Instead of communicating an inner life — or concealing the lack of one — they freeze. They don't bubble private intent or struggle to keep mum. And their body language is mute.

Another tactic runs throughout Pinter's work: sometimes his characters talk too much, which becomes just as evasive as silence. In scene seven, Robert gets drunk at a restaurant and goes on a gab-jag. He knows about Jerry and Emma, though Jerry doesn't. Through a stiff upper lip, Robert blathers about friendship, their careers, everything but the point of his gushing. It's another Pinteresque pause, though this one is filled with words. As performed at the Carter, however, Christopher Randolph (Robert) and

(Jerry) reduce the scene to ag-

itated noise, with nary a

subtext beneath.

Maybe they didn't have enough rehearsal time (one doesn't walk in and do Pinter any more than one does Shakespeare cold), or maybe they haven't translated the play's theories into practice. In either case, the Globe actors stay on the surface. They stop and start, or do go on. But instead of showing us, in language under their language, character-as-iceberg, all we get are ice cubes.

Twenty years ago, the Marquis Public Theater got on a roll, producing hit after hit: the Floyd Gaffney–directed *Tam-bourines to Glory*; Minerva Marquis knocking socks off in *Gemini*; Sam Shepard's *Buried Child* done with cosmic menace; and Kim McCallum as a precise cannibal in *Devour the Snow*.

Today, Diversionary Theatre has that momentum. And its string of well-performed, thought-compelling shows continues with John Logan's Never the Sinner. In 1924, to prove their Nietzschean "ubermensch" superiority, and to italicize their private bond, Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb murdered 14-year-old Bobby Franks, leaving his corpse — the face scarred with hydrochloric acid - in a Chicago marsh. It became the "Crime of the Century. Clarence Darrow defended them against capital punishment, arguing he could hate the sin but "never the sinner."

Logan wrote the screenplays to *Gladiator*, *On Any Sunday*, and *RKO 281*. *Sinner* unfolds cinematically. In brief scenes, which flash backward and forward, we watch the incubation of the event: it resembles kids who start pushing and shoving on a playground, doing macho improvisations and expecting someone to stop them; when no one says no, fists fly and faces get smashed. For Leopold and Loeb, the crime may have been real only the instant it happened. Or possibly not even then, since they show little feeling about it or its consequences.

The script, and Diversionary's terrific production, avoids the facile sociology often attached to "thrill killings." Directed by Sean Murray, the play explores rather than explains. And young actors Jon Levenson (Leopold) and David Stanbra (Loeb) fuse into a symbiotic pairing, each incomplete without the other (the act made them "together now, forever").

The design work, on Diversionary's small, triangular stage, is tops, especially Mike Durst's bright lights and bigger shadows. At first, only George Ye's background music seems out of joint. It's contemporary, though the trial took place 80 years ago. The music, however, makes for sly relevance. Change the names, and Shulamit Nelson's Jazz Age costumes, put these kids in Columbine High, and *Sinner* becomes as current as your next breath.

Beehive

Those tall cans of AquaNet spray are back in the spotlight. As are the gigantic domes of hair, worn by the "Hives," in the Theatre in Old Town's reprise of its 1992 hit show. *Beehive* celebrates the women singers and "girl groups" of the 1960s. But if you caught only the first half hour, you'd swear something's amiss. The six talented performers parody every song and vo-

calist. As in melodrama they exaggerate gestures and tones, from Lesley Gore to the Supremes (who break up before our eyes) and Patti LaBelle (who, when she sold her heart to the "Junkman," was far more serious than this!). Directed by Paula Kalustian, the production abandons its aura of overkill-silly as the '60s lose innocence. And the second half includes first-rate solos: especially Renae Mitchell as Aretha Franklin, Lisa Payton-Davis as Tina Turner, and Joy Yandell as Janis Joplin. The show captures some of the texture of the era. Iill K. Mesaros's costumes are a history lesson (the times weren't the only thing "a-changin' " back then; styles made 180-degree turns about every three years). Jasper Grant's four-piece band keeps the evening cruising. To the young, however, Nick Reid's set may require an explanation. What are those big black round thingies all over the place? Phonograph records. The ones with big holes in the center were 45s. And for the generation of the '60s, they were minted currency.

Worth a try.



An Evening with Eleanor (in her own words)

This tribute to Eleanor Roosevelt begins with a timeworn cliché: we watch an actor slowly get into a role. At first Rosina Reynolds plays herself. In modern dress she speaks lines, tests tones, and presents pages of exposition. Although this tactic illustrates Reynolds's obvious affinity with her subject (this is her third revision of material first performed in 1997), the sketchy, obitstyle treatment gives us less time with Eleanor herself. Reynolds drops the tactic after intermission. When she walks onstage she is Eleanor Roosevelt, and — thanks to precise manners, vocal pitch, makeup, and a thorough understanding of the woman — a much more complete version than Act one promised. While Act one showed an actor's process, Act two emphasizes Eleanor's. Looking back at her legend, it's easy to assume she was always courageous, opinionated, a profound moral voice, when actually she cannot "claim to have been a feminist" in her early years. Reynolds shows us, vividly, the blossoming of a late bloomer. Eleanor Roosevelt grew with the 20th Century and grew into the challenge of its many injustices.

Worth a try.



Tanya Shaffer's a self-proclaimed "travel-head." She says travel lets her "see what else is possible."
That's the noble spin. More to the point, she's quick to escape trouble. When a relationship doesn't work, she flees the country. "It's my life," she says with defiant humor, "if I want to run from it, I can." Let My Enemy recalls a boat trip she made up the River Niger to Timbuktu, a 12-day, 11-night odyssey she recounts with expressive movements, minimal props,

and Benjamin Williams' excellent percussion work accompanying every step. For much of the evening, the telling's more interesting than the tale, and one begins to wonder if all Shaffer will do is sightsee. Then a subtext emerges: almost everyone's nice to her, but why? Is she having a genuine experience, with "pure, personal connections," or is she just a privileged Other, around whom people behave like actors - as sights seen, who expect things in return? And what did she expect from a voyage that turns out, by the end, to be much more revelatory than first imagined? Worth a try.





Seven Weeks of Greeks! The Tragedies

What a great idea! To reacquaint local audiences with the masterworks of ancient Greek tragedy, 6th @ Penn Theater offers a series of staged readings, produced by Linda Castro and David Cohen. I caught the first, Euripides' Medea, and it was a huge success. The approach is refreshing. There is no attempt at polished work, or choices set in stone. Instead, the actors treat the text as if this were the first day of rehearsal: the threshold of exploration. They read in a semi-circle. There's some movement, a slight suggestion of costumes, and (re)acting, but the emphasis is on the word and, as in all Greek tragedy, on an unfolding story at once hair-on-fire-irrational and as logical as a courtroom debate. It doesn't take long to see how pertinent, and compelling these plays are. An informal discussion follows the reading and admission is free (though 6th @ Penn greatly appreciates donations for new lighting instruments). Next play: Euripides' Trojan Women, on February 24. Worth a try.

Struggling Truths

Peter Mellencamp's epic drama is a movie in a play's body. Make that four movies. He recounts 20 years in the history of Tibet, the rise of the Dalai Lama, a polite debate between he and Chairman Mao Zedong, and Communist China's takeover of Tibet. He gives lessons in Buddhism and moral conundrae, and tells the story of Dorie and his sister Rinchen. They become torn between Tibetan tradition and Chinese communism, and face "struggling truths" sprung from fixed ideas. The play concerns one of the most important events of the 20th century and, surprisingly, presents both sides (Tibetan lamas are either saintly Rinpoches or reactionary oppressors, depending on one's point of view). It's a vast canvas that the San Diego Asian American Repertory Theatre

only paints in parts. Like a movie, Mellencamp's script unfolds in brief scenelets, but the production has neither the flow nor the force to sustain them for the play's two hour, 45-minute length. AART has plusses: Sandra Kraus's costumes range from military drab to the distinctive maroon and saffron robes of the Tibetans; and director George Ye's sound design, from bullets to deep bass chanting, is first-class. Although Jyl Kaneshiro and Chad Sakamoto give strong performances, the acting's quite mixed and tends to weaken when needed most in the last hour. There is, however, a truly standout performance. Robert Dahey, one of the area's best young actors, plays Sang Sang, a crazy wisdom guru who delights in proving that reality is illusion or, just when you believe him, might not be after all.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as vou go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scenemaking, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons, but Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening uses various formats. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" - five "directors" invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit." Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group is talented enough (and know when to blackout best) to make the hits more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, has written one of the few brilliant books (*Im*pro) I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art." Worth a try.

Triple Espresso: A Highly

Caffeinated Comedy Hugh Butternutt's done his lounge act at the Triple Espresso Coffeehouse 20 years to the day. While patrons sip a house blend —
"Grape," "Scandinavian Blizzard," or "Mokoko Cocoa Mocha" -Hugh plays '70s tunes on the piano. He and his companions, here to celebrate Hugh's anniversary, got stuck in the '70s. The trio used to be Maxwell, Butternutt, and Bean, a comedy group that never went far. They're "losers," they admit, but not "ordinary" ones. And, hey, their reunion could help them face searing issues from their mediocre pasts. A formulaic story line? Yep. Straight from Forever Plaid. There's also the Forever Plaid problem: the three comedians are far too talented to play inept characters. One's a whiz at the piano.

Another's a first-rate mime, and the third's a crackerjack magician. The trio is so talented, when the plot has them complain of difficulties to overcome, you wish they'd quit trumping up the pseudodrama and get on with this highly entertaining, if lightweight show. (Note: the original cast members have been replaced.)

Worth a try.

Stranded in some post-apocalyptic future? Sixties hippies in a commune so stoned they've lost all bearings? Or are they Strasbergian actors needing a director to give their characters motivation? (I'd swear, on some level, Sam Shepard's Action, first performed in 1975, is a deliberate mindtwister for Method-trained actors). They look forward to their lives yet have no references for same. In Action and Icarus' Mother, both at UCSD, Shepard free-wheels, creating worlds where the real and the imagined could intertwine (finding one's place in a book/ finding one's place in life), or the imaginary can precede, then become, the real. This is anti- not post-modern theater. There's no Po-mo play of signification here. Shepard knows your expectations and deliberately frustrates them. He's out to get you and the wavs you think theater should behave. Approached on their terms, however, his two early one-acts can be fun, especially as directed by Les Waters and performed by MFA students who honor Shepard's lengthy monologues and give these midnight ramblings sharp, precise focus. Worth a try.



the CD, but I don't know if he listened to it or not. We did a song about him that was just called 'Kruk.' Some of the lyrics were I watch but I don't play / I wait for rain delay."

There are other local sports/rocker connections. The Padres' Tim Flannery fronts his own acousticbased rock band. The Chargers' Doug Flutie plays drums in a band with his brother. The Flutie Gang once released a CD called Ramblin' Scramblin' Man. Former SDSU linebacker and current Green Bay Packer Mike Douglas sang in a band called the Packmen and is now a personal trainer in San Diego. Chargers' wide receiver John Jefferson used to play in his own band, and rapper Master P played basketball with the nowdefunct minor-league team the Stingrays.

Jones's new band, the Bill Magee Blues Band, appears at noon on Friday at SDSU's Aztec Center for a free concert. They also appear Wednesday at Patrick's II in the Gaslamp.

Buick. That's an e-mail from local radio veteran John Fox. His 25 years in radio included a six-year stint at top-rated B-100 (predecessor to Star 100.7), which was number one during much of the '70s and '80s. Fox also worked at L.A. and Orange County stations. His most recent local gig was hosting a Saturday

recent local gig was hosting a Saturday night show on KCBQ (1170 AM), which had local Top 40 DJs from the '60s and '70s.

Now he sells cars in Pomona.

"Sure, I miss it. But radio is not fun anymore. There's no commitment to the art. It's all business."

Part of that business is squeezing live DJs out of music radio. Clear Channel controls or co-owns 14 local stations. Its newest station, "My 94.1" (KMYI-FM), signed on Christmas Day with hits from the '80s, '90s, and today. Local DJ Cindy

Spicer, who prerecords or "voice tracks" air shifts for other Clear Channel stations across the country, also works at My 94.1 five hours a day, according to Clear

Channel exec Jim Richards. "But is she on the air live at My 94.1?" I ask.

"Ít's hard to tell," he said.

My 94.1 is getting heavily promoted with TV ads and billboards, but even though it is three months old, My 94.1 does not have a program director or a permanent on-the-air staff.

While Clear Channel has used TV and billboard ad campaigns for several stations, including My 94.1, KGB, and the now-defunct Mix 95.7, alternative station 91X has not recently had the

benefit of Clear Channel's promotion machine. This is according to 91X program director Bryan Shock, who said — in reference to last week's "Blurt" about 92/1 topping 91X in North County Arbitron ratings — "91X has not had billboards or TV ads in over four years."

"It appears the demand for live talent is in the decline," said Sets 102 coowner Bob Hughes. His station is voice tracked all day long except for morning drive time. Hughes says there will always be a demand for quality DJs.

Fox wonders where those quality DJs will come from.

"Now that automation has taken over the smaller markets, there is no place to break into radio and learn your craft. There is no farm club anymore."

Fox says the shrinking DJ pool in larger markets like San Diego is also bad for the future of radio. "Cutting jobs is something that is good for the short run, but you aren't building for the future."

"I would guess we've lost 50 percent of all live DJ jobs since voice tracking started taking hold in late '98," said Rich Brother Robbin, a local DJ who worked here in the '60s, '70s, and '90s. He's now the program director and sole live DJ on an oldies station in Bakersfield.

"Real radio guys hate [voice tracking]. It's a shame, but a lot of things are a shame. You could say it's a shame we don't use typewriters anymore."

year for a DJ, they have a guy from some other town to voice track a shift for an extra \$6000 to \$8000 a year."


Charlie Quinn is estimating how much other stations are saving by replacing live DJs with voice-tracked on-air shifts sent in from other cities. Quinn is the program director of KYXY, a soft-rock station that is one of only four local English-speaking music stations that use live DJs all day long (along with the Planet 103.7, Hot Country 99.3, and Z-90).

The Indianapolis Star recently disclosed inside details about Clear Channel and voice tracking. A West Palm Beach DJ named Fletch recorded a daily air shift for a Clear Channel sister station in Indianapolis, WRZX. Fletch got an extra \$6000 a year to record the five-hour daily show for WRZX. Fletch didn't mind since he said got an extra \$125 a week by spending just 45 minutes a day to record the tracks. (Over a five-hour shift, a DJ typically talks for a total of 20 to 25 minutes. It takes about 45 minutes for a DI to record those inbetween song breaks, load them onto the computer, and send them to the right station.)

Last month Fletch got fired from WRZX for being too crude, prompting him to divulge the inside scoop to the Star. He said Clear Channel DJs like him can make an extra \$30,000 to \$40,000 annually by voice tracking for five or six extra

The story underlined the fact that Clear Channel stations can get away with paying just \$5 an hour for a voice-tracked show. Locally, KGB uses a voice-tracked Cincinnati DJ from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Rock 105's raunchy Mikey Show is piped in from Texas.

Considering that a local station gets between \$150



and \$800 per 60-minute commercial, the income-toexpense ratio can be dramatic.

Clear Channel is not the only broadcaster dumping live DJs. Local non-CC stations like Sets 102, Star 100.7, KIFM, and B-94.9 all use voice tracking to varying degrees throughout the day.

Radio veteran Rich Brother Robbin thinks Clear Channel has gone overboard with across-the-board firings.

"Why are they cut, cut, cutting like they are unless they are in dire financial need? They aren't just cutting fat, but they are cutting blood vessels, bone, and muscle. All the money they owe on the interest for the money they borrowed to buy all those stations is kicking in. This smells an awful lot like Enron.'

Quinn thinks spending money on live DJs is good business. "We are number one with all women over 18 years old [according to Arbitron], and we are number one with adults 25-54."

"Drowning" has a lyric about "dirty lips" — is there any other kind?



Honk If You're a Jerk

"Only creepy-looking little vampire girls came around when I played this techno CD."

e musta thought his car had more guts, as he kept on tooting his horn. I'll show him that a Cadillac is not a car to scorn! Beep beep, beep beep, his horn went beep beep. - The Playmates "Beep Beep (Little Nash Rambler)'

As soon as automobiles became commercially

available, drivers found ways to piss people off with their car horns. In 1912, antiunion activists driving together in convoys used relentless honking as a method

to disrupt rallies held by the newly formed IWW, the Industrial Workers of the World. Dozens of vehicles would drive circles around meeting places and homes of IWW supporters, honking in unison for hours at a time, sometimes tying down their horn buttons to insure continuous blasts. Before a scheduled San Diego lecture, free speech advocate Emma Goldman and her road manager Ben Reitman were confined to their rooms by management at the U.S. Grant Hotel, as a convoy of honking adversaries encircled the building.

"Toward evening," recalled Goldman in a written account, "a bedlam of auto horns and whistles filled the street. 'The vigilantes,' Ben cried. There was a knock at the door.... I was wanted downstairs by the city authorities." The two were separated, and Reitman then disappeared from the hotel, never to be heard from

"My [car] horn isn't designed to piss anyone off or intimidate them, but it is obnoxious," admits Jamie Perez, a freelance writer who frequently contributes articles for the quarterly newsletter Klassic Kar Klub. Perez sells discounted new and salvaged auto parts at local swap meets and describes the sound made by his 1976 Chevy Malibu as "a sphincter-splitting 'Da Da Da Dummmm, Da DUMMMMM charge!' I had it ready to install before the air shocks and mag wheels went in, before I even settled on the paint job."

This seems akin to buying a dog collar and then seeking a matching dog, but Perez says, "If you have a specific type and size dog in mind, and it's gonna go everywhere you go, be part of your family, and cost more than a college tuition, that'd narrow down the collar you'd want it to

"You are what you drive," according to Klassic Kar Klub publisher Robert Tilton. "California car culture is entirely built around that notion.

Or should I say philosophy, since cars represent a total way of life for a lot of people. Building up a dream car takes a lot of chrome and polish, but the image you project also depends on peripherals, such as the 'aural presence' you create with your [car] horn. The right sound draws attention and tells everyone something about the car and [its] driver. It announces that you're hot and

horny, or proud to be a redneck, into trains or show tunes, a hard rock headbanger, whether you're married or single or even your racial background. Mexicans tend

to install horns that play Mexican music. A car blasting out 'Sweet Home Alabama' or the Dukes of Hazzard theme says everything you need to know about the driver."

Musical car horns like the ones Tilton refers to are among the products manufactured by Wolo, which lists its best-selling models as the ones that play "Happy Birthday," followed by those featuring "The Macarena" or Christmas tunes like "Jingle Bells," "We Wish You a Merry Christmas," "Deck the Halls," and "O Come, All Ye Faithful." Also popular are cinematic soundtrack slices from The Pink Panther; Rocky; Fiddler on the Roof; La Bamba; Hello, Dolly! and The Godfather theme.

In the weeks since September 11, the company can barely keep up with the increased demand for models that play "Stars and Stripes" or "America the Beautiful."


These newer electronic horns usually offer more variety than low-tech air-powered machines, and often at less cost. Letters to Klassic Kar Klub from auto enthusiasts with vintage (pre-1940) horns make it clear that they disdain fancy-schmancy singing horns, preferring to blow their noise with an old-school honker.

"I hit my 'ahhhh-OOO-gaaah' blaster when I pull into traffic or as I'm parking," says vintage Cadillac restorer and collector Thad Rommel. "Unless there's a cop around, anyway. Someone told me the decibel level violates some kind of noise ordinance. I think it's a great sound...[it] harkens back to another era, you know?"

Has another driver ever been startled enough by his horn to cause a near mishap or actual

"Well," he says after a pause, "maybe a few fellas get, you know, a wake-up call...if they're doing something really stupid."

Thanks to technology, it's possible to get your own wake-up call at home, and you don't even have to leave your driveway. Ultimate-

soundarchive.com offers a library of audio files, from 7K to 35K, containing noises that most people would rather avoid: "Car Horns in Gridlock," "Impatient Driver Honks," "British Car Horn," and "Bus Horn." Autospeak.com has equally pointless if less irritating WAV files, like "Miata Horn," "Beepbeep," "Passing Car Sounds Its Horn," and 8.18 seconds of "Horns, Horns and More Horns."

Actual hardware doesn't come so cheap, but true gearheads don't mind dishing out the bucks, especially since some men believe that honking their horns enables them to meet and seduce women more effectively.

Following a lead from a mechanic, I phone "Manly" Dan Sanger, the proud owner of a 1977 Chevy van he has retrofitted into a time-capsule artifact identical to the chromed-and-lifted love mobiles rarely seen today outside of Cheech and Chong movies and That '70s Show. His horn is the sound of a steam engine train whistle, followed by the chug-chug-chug of it racing down the track, louder and louder.

"That gets me a lot of action at tailgate parties, or in the parking lots at car shows and racetracks, because that's where all the chicks are that're into cars and vans," he insists.

"I use the train whistle to attract girls the same way birds attract a mate, by hitting their ears with an irresistible sound even before they meet me. I lay on the horn when I'm pulling into the lot, so everyone looks at me, and then I hit it again when I'm pulling into my space, so that any girls interested by what they heard and saw know where to find me. Most of them usually wander

past my spot a couple of times, trying not to let me notice that they're checking me out. If they like what they see, they'll walk right over and start flirting.'

Does Manly Dan genuinely believe there is a statistical likelihood that women in these environments are "aroused" by a guy leaning on his horn?

"Hell yeah, I see it happen all the time. Not that a horn does the trick all by itself. It helps if they see you've got a keg of beer, or maybe some expensive-looking steaks cooking on a nice, shiny Webber grill. I found out that I gotta be careful what music I play in the van though. Only creepy-looking little vampire girls came around when I played this techno CD I picked up. I'm not into biker chicks, so no more Motorhead or Sabbath, I actually like 'em pretty young, so I play tapes I made off 91X a few years ago.... I don't know who most of the bands are, but when a girl comes up and says, 'Cool, you're into so-and-so,' I can usually nod my head and talk enough shit to pull it off.

Sanger sees his horn as one piece of the bait that he uses when fishing for females. "I'll put it this way — my horn makes a big sound, it just plain screams 'big,' and girls always get turned on by 'big' — you know what I mean?

Neither Sanger, nor any other men interviewed for this article, could provide contact with a woman willing to substantiate that the sound made by a car horn had any factor in the formation of a relationship of any duration.

Women informally surveyed at bars, auto parts stores, and shopping center parking lots only remember honking as part of unpleasant in-




cidents. Many describe taking walks and being mistaken as hookers by honkers dogging their every step. Others recall when a sudden ear-splitting horn blast, apparently intended to impress or attract, is instead perceived as a threat.

Romance on the roll may well be possible by serenading your intended with the assistance of Wolo's model 336 "Jukebox" (\$34.99). One keyboard touch launches any of its 34 programmable songs, including ballistic blasts of romance like "Unchained Melody," "You Are My Sunshine," and the title tune from Love Story. Lotharios with less finesse, and less moola, can simply announce "I'm horny" with a model 350 "Wolf Whistle" (\$19.99), designed to impress sidewalk hotties with a shrill twotone blast of love-hungry lip service. Wolo's air-powered musical horns use a 12-volt compressor and several plastic trumpets to broadcast 118-decibel arrangements of top-selling tunes like "Wedding March" (\$89.99). For those hoping to win the heart of that special Klingon, the Star Trek theme boldly goes to the tune of \$119.99.

No fewer than 35 fully electronic and truly esoteric sounds bellow forth from Wolo's model 345 "Animal House" horn package (\$49.99). It's not impossible to imagine finding a use for "Dog," "Cat," "Horse," or maybe even "Duck" or "Rooster," but would the sound of a sheepish ba-a-a-a-a-a-a really make another driver ba-a-a-ack off?

The same model comes with a microphone so the system can be used as a PA. Ten siren sounds are also included with "Animal House," none of them appreciated by law enforcement, paramedics, or firefighters ("Police Car," "Fire Truck," "Ambulance", etc.). The "European Police Siren" is sure to confuse U.K. tourists already battling their inherent left-lane instincts.

The female salesclerk at Wolo, who I reach through the company's 800 phone line, while happy to extol the quality and popularity of the company's car horns, is unwilling to acknowledge any "pickup line" potential, even when I mention that my article research may include a product purchase. "A lot of our horns make great gifts for men to buy for their wives or their girlfriends, and that can be very romantic. I get a lot of couples looking for a particular song or a sound because it has special or personal meaning to them. I mean, we have tons of women customers.... They love buying a really cool horn for their car or as a gift for their men. But for a man who's mainly looking for a woman to start a relationship with, we don't recommend introducing yourself by honking at them." ■

Jazz Genes

Go shopping for crew socks, and at day's end you will be a larger, more interesting person.

ravel is the great educator, no matter how obtuse, bloody-minded, or insensitive a soul you may be. You're going to pick up large pieces of information, even if it's not ap-

parent at the time. Which is a nice thing: you don't have to learn the language or go to museums, none of that dreary edification stuff. You can simply sit on a bench in the sun or go shopping for crew socks, and at day's end you will be a larger, more interesting person than when you woke up in the morning. I tell this to the young when I teach. I ask them why they are sitting in graduate school when they should be sitting in train stations. They pay me no mind or suffer my counsel with barely suppressed

contempt. They are on chart to grab the brass ring and vanquish the likes of me in the process.

Not that I like train stations or airport lounges; it's just that one must pass through them en route from one place to another; unless you're driving, of course, but that's not very

interesting. You might as well stay home. I was made to reconsider the virtues of travel recently on my return from a trip to Vermont and Montreal. And since

this is a music column, I'll tell you what of interest I had the good fortune to listen to.

I was, for a week, the "visiting writer" at the Vermont Studio Center in Johnson, Vermont (about an hour east-northeast of Burlington in northern Vermont), and very pleased to be there. It's a pretty place with a small river running through it, surrounded by hills and, in the distance, what I presume to be the Green Mountains, which are not very mountainy by western U.S. standards but quite adequate, thank you. The place was full of bright, arty people, several of whom chose to share their musical enthusiasms with me. But first I made a brief musical detour north, to what is called the Northeast

Kingdom, to visit my old friend, the poet Bill Corbett, whose wife's family has owned a lovely spread on Caspian Lake in Greensboro, Vermont, for many years. Bill's wife, Beverly, had

an interesting grandmother who was an amateur architect and spent some years in Berkeley, California, where she would have come under the influence of Bernard Maybeck and the stick style of architecture, a variation on the late-19th-century Arts and Crafts movement, which made use of local materials and traditional handicrafts in building design. There are a number of buildings that make up the family's summer compound, rustic in design and opening out toward the lake,

with a lovely, roughhewn colonnade connecting them all.

Quite a spot. Particularly at sundown, sitting on deck chairs outside the main house, watching the sky go different colors in the southern hills beyond the lake, drinking vodka and tonic, and listening

to a Don Byas disc on the French Gitanes label that Bill had picked up recently in Montreal. One would be hard-pressed to

come up with a more congenial tenor saxophonist for the surroundings and time of day.

Carlos Wesley Byas was born in Muskogee, Oklahoma, in 1912 to a piano-playing mother and a father who played seven reed instruments. If you think genes don't play a big part in determining who's a musician and who's not, think again, cousin. By as started on the alto sax and violin and graduated to the tenor. His first gigs were with Bennie Moten, Terrence Holder, and Walter Page's Blue Dev-

ils in the late '20s, great territory bands of the

era that would spawn artists like Count Basie and

Lester Young, whom Byas would replace in the

Basie band from 1941 to '43. Along the way, Byas would work with Lionel Hampton, Eddie Barefield, Buck Clayton, Don Redman, Lucky Millinder, Andy Kirk, and Benny Carter, which should give you an idea what the greatest ban-

dleaders of the era thought of Byas's work on tenor. After his stint with Basie, Byas was active in the 52nd Street scene in New York between '43 and '46, playing with Coleman Hawkins, Dizzy Gillespie, and his own groups, while exploring the new bop idiom, at which he became as proficient as he had formerly been with swing. In fact, along with Lucky Thompson and others, Byas is one of the great transitional figures in jazz, straddling the swing and bop era. It's a delicious moment in jazz, the mid-'40s, with the new style hatching from the old, taking what it can use of the previous music, and leaving the rest.

Don Byas was to tour Europe with Redman in 1946, liking it so well that he stayed put — first in Paris then the Netherlands – joying large success among European jazz fans, playing with groups made up of local musicians or with visiting American bands. The Europe he would have seen for the first time in the fall of '46 would have been largely devastated by the war,

but Paris had been spared, and it obviously looked good to Byas, as it had to many





sonnel, a guitar joining bass, piano, and drums on most of the tracks

The rhythm section is not the best, but it makes little difference as they're miked poorly. It wouldn't have made a great deal of difference

if it were Bud Powell, Max Roach, and Charles Mingus playing piano, drums, and bass instead of Maurice Vander, Jacques "Popof" Medvedo, and Claude Marty, you couldn't hear them anyway, though the former rhythm section would have been pushing Byas, perhaps harder than he might otherwise have chosen to go.



Byas and his Frenchmen were just right. Given the foregrounding of Byas's tenor in the miking of the sessions, his ripeness of tone and every nuance of inflection seemed magnified, and with this caliber of playing, it made for a whole lot of listening pleasure. In fact, it was with a trace of wistfulness that I put down my drink and went inside for dinner, even as splendid as that turned out to be. Listening to the disc again in my apartment here on the West Coast, Don Byas sounds every bit as gracefully, regally, in control on these 18 cuts (and the rhythm section sounds a bit better), but my word, it sure did sound sweet up there by Caspian Lake, with a little bit of coolness creeping into the air and the hills disappearing, one by one, in the dark.

Lest I forget, if you turn out to be a Don Byas fan, my absolute favorite album of his is A Tribute to Cannonball on Columbia, recorded in 1961 (Byas died in 1972). Adderley produced the album, presumably the reason for the title. Byas has Bud Powell and Kenny Clarke on board for this outing, along with Pierre Michelot on bass and Idrees Sulieman on trumpet. Byas had not recorded for six years before this December 17 date, and some kind of Christmas spirit must have been in the air because it's a doozy. Try looking for it under Bud Powell's name. ■

In last year's excellent movie *Ghost World*, there's a funny scene in which Steve Buscemi's obsessive record-collector geek goes to see an aged blues singer perform in a club. The singer looks ancient, and his simple, quiet, beautiful acoustic blues sounds even older. A woman tells Buscemi that if he really likes old-time blues he should stick around for the headlining act — which turns out to be a young, white band playing bombastic, electric, Led Zeppelin-style blues-inflected hard rock with lyrics about picking cotton.

We all think we know what the blues is, but it seems none of us can agree with each other. When the Jon Spencer Blues Explosion entered the scene ten years ago, a lot of purists attacked them for daring to use the term to describe their scuzzy. punk- and hip-hop-flavored rock 'n' roll. But the blues wasn't always the predictable, regimented system of 12-bar chord progressions and pentatonic scales that's playing in a bar near you tonight. In a way, the JSBX heralded a revival of the blues - once again it wasn't something you had to study, it was something you had to go out and play. Or at least that's what a lot of new bands

Whether or not the JSBX deserves to take credit, bands like the White Stripes and the **Immortal Lee County Killers** are now leading a wave of garagey, minimalistic indie-punk blues rock acts. The ILCK even gave the sound a name with its album title *The Essential Fucked Up Blues*. The Alabama duo of **Chetley "Cheetah" Weise** and **J.R.R. Tokien** ("The Tokien One") plays



a gritty, spastic, violent music that's all

wrong. And that's a good thing.



The dark side of jamming is when self-indulgent instrumental noodling gets passed off as beer-powered entertainment. Otherwise, the art can be a motherlode of instrumental fireworks from musicians freed from the bondage of the set list. And perhaps no one knows this more than the guitarist **Scottie Blinn**. His recently revived jam sessions are, first, by invitation only (not an open mike) and, second, come with rules. For example, a recent e-mail says, "Bring small amps, strippeddown sound, play as much or as little as you want...since there are no limits on play time. keep the volume low so no one gets stepped on." This week's jam features heavyweights like Tony Tomlinson and Patrick Skog from the Fremonts, Smedley B. and Paul Fafulo from Candye Kane's band, Len Rainey, and Eric

Von Herzen from Social Distortion.

Blinn worked for the better part of a decade as the guitar muscle in a local blues outfit called the Mississippi Mudsharks. Born in Victorville, California, the Blinn family moved here when Scott was 2. He attended Cleveland Elementary the year before Brenda Spencer's shooting spree. Blinn picked up guitar at the age of 13. During the Mudsharks' heyday, they ran a jam in Ocean Beach that was entertaining and. as such, was responsible for developing homegrown

talent. For example, the blues harpist Billy Watson came into his own through that jam. As for Blinn, he has been pounding out dents at a custom-car shop for the last year or so...laying back, as he puts it, from a case of local-music-scene burnout. His new band, the Tiki Torchers, is a tough and stripped-down version of what he had envisioned for the







Savor the Moment

Dateline Moscow: Record winter highs turn Kremlin into vast mud puddle as snowbanks melt. New York: Furriers report minimum retrieval of minks from summer storage, due to sweltering winter temperatures. San Diego, CA: downtown lows last weekend in the high 30s, with snow and hail in the suburbs. Personally, I was digging out my old down-filled parka from its storage bag in the back of the closet. The weather has turned topsy-turvy, and we seem to be on the bitter end this time. In this cold, cold (sniffle) world, I turn to wintry comfort food.

And where do I go? To a cozy oasis on Fifth Avenue a few blocks south of University, a peaceful area that houses such snug spots as Mixx (international home cooking) and Hash House A Go-Go (heartland cookery). Now Savor makes three, with its Mediterranean-tinged seasonal menu, changing frequently to seize on each week's best ingredients. We arrived on the night it snowed in San Diego (happily not in Hillcrest), and my friends and I instantly cuddled up to the warm surroundings of a one-time cottage recently converted from a Presbyterian wedding chapel. Owner/chefs Drew McPartlin and John Paul Canton performed most of the renovations themselves, painting walls, staining woodwork, and building a bar into the entry area, and they had a raised patio constructed in front of the cottage, holding six tables for sunnyday brunches and lunches. The dining room is small and cozy, with comfortable, high-backed wooden chairs and just ten tables strategically placed to fit with not an inch to spare. Old-time jazz instrumentals play very softly in the back-

We contemplated the menu while enjoying Bread & Cie olive bread with an enjoyable balsamic-olive oil dip. My friends and I quickly fixated on the first menu listing, fresh mushroom soup — the very thing! The soup put us on notice that the young chefs at Savor are serious about their fungi. It wasn't the creamy bisque we expected, but a clean, light poultry broth dotted with tomato, with a faint white-truffle aroma and the muscular flavors of minced fresh herbs. Its contents would do a mushroom encyclopedia proud — there were champignons, straw mushrooms, Chinese black wood-ear fungus, a few black chanterelles, even a lone yellowfoot

(better known as the "fairy ring" mushroom). In the center floated a large raviolus-like object, a wonderful thin-skinned dumpling filled with creamy mascarpone cheese that gushed into the soup when you cut into it.

The chill had put us all in a pretty cheesy mood, so we continued with a pleasing Bosc pear salad with creamy blue Stilton, candied walnuts with a little nip of chili pepper, and

mizuna (a frisée-like Japanese green) with a flavorful pomegranate dressing. We commandeered a pasta dish for another tummywarming appetizer of "soft potato

and goat cheese ravioli." The silky housemade pasta shells with their suave filling were immersed in a rich, creamy beurre blanc and garnished with elegantly Gothic-looking black trumpet mushrooms, a.k.a. black chanterelles (nicknamed 'angels of death" — they're not poisonous, they just look that way).

Grilled Hudson Valley foie gras drew a mixed reception. The liver's interior was soft and marshmallowy, but the outside was so hardcrisped that it tasted a bit, well, liverish. The accompaniments were tasty grilled mango, caramelized red onion with balsamic glaze, mizuna, and a great deal of melted butter more butter than anyone really wants, given the liver's own fat content. In a lesser starter, rather ordinary-tasting dayboat sea scallops clashed with a lean, tangy blood-orange vinaigrette.

The scallops, in the company of other mar-

itime companions, were better served by an entrée of splendid, revisionist "bouillabaisse." (It should be called cacciucco, for the Tuscan seafood stew that it's

modeled after — but how many of us would rise to the challenge of ordering that out loud?) Rather than drowning in a bowl of bubbling fish broth, where they're prone to overcook, the extraordinarily fresh shellfish were perched atop a saucy reduction of saffron-fennel lobster broth, remaining pristinely toothsome. I've often been terrorized in this town by evil mussels (old, "off," tough), but the small black-shelled mollusks were sweetly perfect, and even the

tiny Manila clams revealed an unexpected capacity for tenderness. Completing the array were a local spiny lobster and a velvety fillet of Chilean sea bass. The secret, I learned later, is that the seafood comes in fresh every day (except Sunday, of course).

Other entrées were considerably heartier - rich comfort food. You could truly pig out on a mammoth double pork chop (three inches thick, with at least a pound of meat), rubbed with fennel and garlic and roasted rather rare. Its tangy-sweet Calvados and green apple "vinaigrette" tasted like very grown-up applesauce, and it was scattered with a garlicky, pesto-like gremolata garnish. A rosti potato cake and several hunks of faintly bitter balsamic-braised

radicchio were ideal against the apple. We did wish, though, that the interior of the pork (at this size, more a roast than a chop) had some additional fla-– a brine, a stuffing – anything besides monolithic meat would have been nice.

Veal osso bucco in a light, herbal meat broth had fairly fatty meat falling off the bone; when it snows in San Diego, our mouths don't count calories. The trembling center of a beautiful large marrow-bone just begged to be spooned out and savored. Dear reader, the use of marrow spoons having fallen into desuetude along with the whalebone corset: I confess to having employed the reverse end of my appetizer fork to scoop out this celestial substance. Here, the garnishes were hedgehog mushrooms (with a delightful spongy texture), cream-laden puréed Yukon Gold potatoes, and sweet little baby carrots and parsnips from Chino Farms.

From the poultry choices, we opted for a grilled breast of Moulard drake, a manmade cross of a Muscovy and a Mallard, bred and fed specifically for a large breast and even larger liver — which shows up on

menus as foie gras. The boneless medallions of meat tasted very steaklike, in a juniperscented, blood-orange glaze with reprises of mizuna, baby carrots, and potato purée.

The pan-roasted free-range Sonoma chicken was instantly identifiable as a "Rocky Junior" not a true free-ranger but a compromise chicken, naturally raised but mass-produced for supermarkets. Its taste and texture are better than factory-raised fowl but not as distinguished as wholly unchained birds. A large hind-quarter arrived with a "winter Tuscan bread salad," consisting of lightly toasted peasant-bread croutons soaking in a thick and flavorful gravylike reduction sauce along with about a peck of fresh sage leaves that gradually subjugated all other flavors with their slightly bitter musk. Even the clusters of firm black chanterelles were eventually infused with the excessive herbage.

After these generous and rather rococo entrées, we wanted only the simplest sweets, and this kitchen is in harmony with such desires. Blood-orange granita, another name for a slushee, tasted only of juice and

ice, with minimal added sugar. An "apple tart tatin" was actually a thin-crusted, barely sweet green-apple tart, pleasant enough but with no sign of the caramel that marks a *tatin*; it came with a scoop of house-brand supermarket-quality vanilla ice cream. Mever lemon crème brûlée was of the tightly knit eggy variety, with just a hint of citrus, and a mascarpone chocolate cheesecake arose from the weighty, almost fudgy branch of the cheesecake family.

The menu at Savor changes frequently, following the market's best seasonal ingredients, and it will lighten up as the weather warms. I'm looking forward to enjoying a brunch on the sunny patio some balmy weekend this spring — hev, hev you, unhand that Mimosa, I'm still working on it!

ABOUT THE CHEFS

Savor actually opened on September 13 but kept a low profile for two months, feeding friends and working out the kinks before announcing its "grand opening." It evolved from a catering business run by a partnership of two chefs, Drew McPartlin and John Paul Canton. The catering business

is still active, carried out by the restaurant's in-house staff.

Although it's unusual to have two chefs as equal partners in a restaurant, there's little tension over the division of labor: "There's so much to do in the restaurant that we just find our own way to organize things," says Canton. "We work on the menu together. We divide up the work as we go. And our culinary staff are trained and educated and have some pretty good culinary skills, and we're open to suggestions from them." McPartlin is the one with overall responsibility for the wine list, seeking bottlings that complement specific dishes, but the bartender chooses which wines (a red and a white) to put on special each week.

Both chefs are San Diego natives and are graduates of the CIA (Culinary Institute of America in New York), but they met much earlier: "We've known each other since we were both in grade school in Coronado," said Canton. "I went to elementary school in Morocco -Casablanca — but my family came back here every summer. Then I went to high school in Coronado and worked at Chez Loma in Coronado. I started

out dishwashing. I really wanted to get out of that position pretty quickly, and I was curious about what was going on with the chef. He [Chef Ken Irvine] brought me up to doing some preparation, some cooking, and from there I went on to the CIA Then I went back to school and got a master's degree in business, concentrating on restaurant management. I interned at Le Grenadin in Paris, a three-star Michelin, three-diamond Mobil restaurant - working there for free. And Drew got into the restaurant business through his family - his father owns a restaurant in Coronado, McP's Irish Pub. We ended up going to the CIA about the same time. He continued studying at Grey-

stone in Napa Valley. Canton worked at Mimosa in Los Angeles and was opening chef at Cafe Des Artistes for the same owners. McPartlin owned the short-lived Artemis Grill in La Jolla: "It was a bad location for the type of food rustic Italian dishes, the same style as we have here. After he closed his restaurant in Bird Rock, he said I should come down and we'd start catering together. It sounded like a good opportunity, so I quit my job

in L.A. and we just went fullfledged into catering. We got a pretty good clientele through word of mouth, and we decided we needed to have a restaurant, or at least to rent a kitchen for catering, so we looked around for a few months. We wanted to do a sandwich shop or a nice little café...

"We have a country-style menu. We do a little Asian here and there, but we don't really mix anything like French-Asian our dishes are strictly Asian. strictly Italian, strictly French, not mingled. We always try to accommodate vegetarians and vegans with an appetizer and an entrée nightly.

"Due to our refrigeration limits, we have daily seafood, daily meat, and daily produce orders coming in — produce every day, meat and fish Monday through Saturday. We get the mushrooms and most of our produce from Specialty Produce — they're on the cutting edge of purveyors; they bring in a lot of exotic things. We get a lot of baby produce for garnishes and our nice herbs from Chino. We go twice a week; it's really great because you can see all the wonderful stuff that's in season." ■

Early-Bird Hicks

ll this coulda been mine," I'm saying. "Okay, Carla's. She says her great-granddaddy owned it

"Owned La Mesa? Yeah, right," says Hank. "Who was her granddaddy? Mr. Mesa?'

"No, buttonbrain. He was an Arguello. Spanish. Got given 60,000 acres. That's what she says. 'Course that was back when. But if they'd just held on to the danged land...

"Uh-huh. Everybody's ancestor was a lord. And 'peabrain' is the word you wanted, birdbrain.

It's been like this all day. We've been tossing insults along with bails of hay — helping a guy we call "Mr. Piggy," 'cause he wants to build his house out of straw. Them suckers are heavy, prickly, play hell with your hands, and love to land on your tootsies. So by now, around six, we're both kind of sparky, 'specially since we've got nothing in our gut.

Hank brought us here to La Mesa's village area because it has cafés sticking out into the street all the way up from the trolley. Village Garden is at the top. It looks kinda grandmaish, but in a comforting way. Greens and whites, with flower-shaped lamps sprouting out of overhead fans, and green, flowery carpet, brown table cloths, white wood trellises between sections, brass rails with momsy curtains between booths, and I see they have a big caged outside

Tables out there have candles. Except no

way at these temperatures. We look for a spot in the booth area. Not easy. Seems like all La Mesa's decided to come for Saturday-night dinner. Families, mostly. Also a lot of older folks, so you know it's gotta be reasonable value. Then

there's Hank and me, looking like a couple of strawhead hicks straight off the farm.

'Uh, miss," Hank calls to the waitress. Janice. She's blonde, perky, kitted out in dark blue shorts and light blue shirt. "We too late for the early bird?"

Janice looks at her watch.

"Ten past six. Stopped at six. All right, but you'd better move it.

We sit down. I start talking to the old guy next door. "Huh, this used to be the Drew Ford auto showroom," I tell Hank. "They had cars on display, right where we're sitting. Joe Drew still comes and eats here."

"Uh, 'scuse me, pointy head," says Hank. "You want to pay full price? Just keep on gabbing with the neighbors.'

OK, so where is this early-bird list, wurzle?" "Inside, rattleweed."

"Oh, yeah. I see it, neverwuz."

It's one big menu that includes breakfast all day, plus a dozen different omelets, and, oh man, I could have this: SOS. You-know-what on a shingle. Creamed chipped beef on toast, \$6.45. Then lots of sandwiches and salads, and eight "signature" "big game" burgers. Everything costs from 6 to 9 bucks, except — uh-oh, those are daytime prices. Dinners run 8 to 11 dollars. Like, the Country Boy Sampler, a mix

of Virginia baked ham, chicken and dumplings, and Yankee pot roast with potato and veggies.

The early-bird special is a three-course meal plus a drink for \$7.95. That's more like it. Main dish choice is liver and onions, grilled Alaska cod, meat loaf, chicken strips, baked ham, or hamburger steak.

What's it to be?" says Janice.

"After you, muttonhead," says Hank.

"Okay, meat loaf."

"Uh, hel-lo, she wants to know what you're going to have, clodhopper.3

"Like I said, cement head: meat loaf." Hank sighs. "Ma'am," he says, "I'll have the

Then we have to choose between soup and salad. And soup and soup. Hank takes the cream of broccoli. Me, turkey and rice. Anything

"Drink?"

This is the free one. Soda, coffee, iced tea. Hank goes for iced tea. I need hot steaming coffee; I never did get breakfast this morning. It's left me feeling scratchy, like you hadn't

The soups arrive pronto, along with crackers. We lunge in. Oh, yes. Thick, meaty, steamy; rice almost makes it food, not slurpy soup.

We're hardly through them when Janice hauls up with the main dishes. For me, two half-inchthick slices of meat loaf with gravy on top, a whole bunch of steamed veggies like Grandma would want you to eat, cauliflower, carrot, broccoli, mushrooms, and a nice splot of mashed potatoes with a big brown crater-lake of gravy.

"Oh, yes. Oh, yes," I mutter. Hank's got pretty much the same except his has a slab of ham with a pineapple ring on top. Oh, and we each get a big slice of bread. Great, tender stuff.

'That's our own baked bread," says Janice. "And the mashed potatoes — that's not powder. We smash 'em here."

Then here's Janice with the apple cobbler still part of the deal. Hank turns down the cream, so I get double. Heh heh. It's like the Red Baron diving into clouds. "Hey, knucklehead," I burble. "We could just be eating at the best mesa in La Mesa."

"Whu?"

"Table, dude. La mesa, 'the table.'"

We pay Mary at the counter. Here, the aromas of their baked breads and cinnamon rolls just about overpower you. "This is what you want," says Mary. She brings up a loaf of apple-nut bread. Oh, man. It smells so great.

"Three ten," she says. "Take it back to the farm with you." ■

Steak with Some Scientists

"Take a little lime, a little salt on your hand, and a glass of strong red wine."

t has become conventional to say that one need not be enslaved by the old conventions about food and wine pairing. I cannot easily count the number of times I have read that "only white wine with fish" is a rule admitting of many ex-

ceptions. But new or old, some conventions endure. From Overstreet's New Wine Guide, just one of any number of places where you can find this sort of wine-withfood advice: "The principle of balance is as crucial to food-wine pairings as it is to viticulture and viniculture. The weight of the wine

should match that of the dish. Neither should overpower the other. A light fruity wine such as Beaujolais Nouveau, for example, paired with big stews or game will taste watery. A big, rich oaky Cabernet is too powerful for many dishes; grilled steaks or roast lamb, however, can stand up to it. Overstreet's claim seems to make sense — intensely flavored wines need intensely flavored foods.

After receiving his title as a Master of Wine, Tim Hanni decided he smelled something fishy about even this more general guideline, and about every other guideline to boot. He decided that even he, a Master, did not really know what he was talking about — he did not know the why behind his principles. He went looking for answers. "I started going to scientists and anthropologists to find out what was up. I was having steak with some scientists one time, and I was going off on the fat and the phenolics and why it's a good match." He was challenged. He fired back, "Didn't you see? The tannins" — in the wine, which can produce an astringent, bitter sensation on the palate — "got milder."

"'Have you ever tried steak without salt?' replied

the challenger. 'Salt suppresses bitterness.'" Hanni grilled another steak — this time without salt and tried it against the wine. The tannin relief" didn't happen. The whole idea of red meat and red wine is a complete fallacy." He started digging,

this time into history. "We started to market wine differently after World War II. This was primarily an American phenomenon. There were a lot of inexpensive European red wines available; so, somebody created the idea: well, Americans eat meat." The consequent marketing line? "'Red wine goes with

meat.' But there's absolutely no sensory basis for what happens with red wine and red meat as currently promoted."

He offers proof in the form of "Tim's Tequila Trick." "Take a little lime, a little salt on your hand, and a glass of strong red wine. Taste wine, lick hand, try wine again — wine gets smooth." I tried this myself with a young Cabernet — a wine I usually avoid because of its often brutal tannins and can attest to its effectiveness. The tannins disappeared; I was left with flavors of salt and ripe fruit.

But Hanni doesn't stop with attacking the red wine-red meat matchup. He directly contradicts the Overstreet dictum of balance: "You can do this [tequila trick] with a piece of petrale sole and a huge Cabernet, and guess what? It's delicious. The wine is delicious and the fish is delicious and none of the things we think happen happen. We've just built this incredible fantasy of prohibitions to enjoying food and wine and we call it wine and food matching.

He kept digging. "I had two years invested in 'what's the difference between taste and flavor?' Now, I could sit down with someone, not neces-

sarily involved in wine, and say, 'I want to talk about the dvnamics of wine and food, what happens in the human experience of wine and food. I want to focus on taste and flavor, and here's how I'm going to define those two words for this discussion.' Then I could have the discussion and they could say, 'Got it.' It really doesn't sound like that big a deal."

The definitions? "Taste is the set of sensations that humans can experience, arguably comprised of sweet, sour, bitter, salty, and umami." (Umami is a taste conveyed by glutamate, an amino acid found in protein-rich foods that contributes

to what some have called the "deliciousness" or "savory character" in food.) "Flavor, then, is a combination of sensations which include taste, smell, touch, something called chemesthesis that is a chemical irritation of your touch nerve endings but not touch per se, and then psychological predispositions.'

Hanni's research into taste led him to conclude that balance was indeed essential but that the balance required was more fundamental than "big wines with big foods" or any other such principle. What was needed was a balance of the five tastes. He now believes that "when you make oysters correctly, when you make duck correctly, when you make that rib of beef or that piece of trout correctly, then it's good and it's good with wine, period. If you like grassy Sauvignon Blanc, then go! If you like oaky Sauvignon Blanc, then go! Chardonnay, Pinot Noir, Cabernet — you name it.'

He tells a story to demonstrate. "This is going back about six years: we were at the Clift Hotel [in San Francisco]. I asked the staff, 'What's your most popular dish?' It happened to be a roast duck with a cherry confiture. I said, 'Okay, what wine would you recommend with it?' 'Oh, the Pinot Noir, because of the cherries.' 'Oh, the Saint-Émilion because of the cherries.' 'Oh, the Merlot...' These were just the personal favorites of each server. They all made the same associations



duck is red [so red wine]; it's a cherry sauce [so wine with cherry notes], etc., etc. We tried all the wines [with the duck], and they all sucked. I said, 'Now hang on.' I ran over to the bar, got some lime and some salt, and put them into the confiture. We tried it [with the wines], and the chef who made the dish said, 'Wow. This is better.'

Hanni's explanation: "The natural sugars and umami compounds in the food will create a sensory adaptation. For example, you jump into a pool and it feels cool. If you then go and run in the cold sprinklers, then jump back into the pool, the pool will feel warm." Your sense will have adapted. So, also, with taste. Because of the sweetness of the cherries and the umami in the duck meat, "vou will no longer be able to taste the sweetness and *umami* in the wine. You'll come up with this metallic taste in the wine from the *umami* in the food. What made the wine delicious will be gone. Add just a touch of salt and lemon juice" - balance the sweet and umami — "and watch your wine reappear."

And, he says, history and culture back him up. "If you go get a beefsteak in Tuscany, it's a well-salted steak served with a piece of lemon. If you get anything à la bordelaise, it was traditionally finished with a squeeze of lemon juice. I can show the relationship of salt and acidity with wine and food in every culture where wine was a part of that culture."

Preparations are generally simple and consistent among locales. The chain's facili-ties near San Francisco purchase, process, and truck the catch to its various branches. At the small retail fish market in the downtown branch, products prove slightly fresher than most supermarkets', but less vibrant than at the top fish markets (e.g., Point Loma or 99 Ranch). Identical seafood is served in the dining room, the oyster bar, and at Top of the Market. But there's better quality at the sushi bar, emphatically the top Fish Market venue. The sushi rice is well seasoned and just sticky enough, the seafood there is pristine and preparation is careful and some times creative. The "Ichiban Hamachi" (also available in the dining rooms) is outstanding — and for a truly sexy treat, share a pair of "Honeymoon Oysters" with your honey. No reservations, but the space is vast, so waits are brief. Restaurant open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. Also in Del Mar; mini-branch near Fashion Valley.

One tasty starter is "crabioli," fried wonton stuffed with crab and melted cream cheese ("crab Rangoon" by another name, but smoother). You can choose buckets of steamed, barbecued, or garlic crab (of various subspecies) or go for fried or grilled seafood or steaks, or salads. 

THE FIRESIDE 439 West Washington Avenue (Centre City Parkway), Escondido, 760-745-1931. The Fireside bills itself as "North County's Finest Steak House." It also seems to be the area's community center, a rambling building with a karaoke bar, nightclub, poolroom, and meeting rooms for many lodges. The dining room is large and lovely, plush and quiet, with soft lighting, a freestanding central fireplace, and seating in cushy booths. The menu is part steakhouse, part 1975 French-Continental — think duck à *l'orange*, tournedos Rossini, breaded rack of lamb — by now, these are American comfort foods. All steaks and prime rib are USDA Choice or better, dry-aged for maximum flavor, cooked to your preference. You can taste the difference. Sometimes an octogenarian pianist tinkles out old show tunes. In one of the best (and prettiest) Indian restaurants in the area, the refined cuisine of the north is served in a curvacious, serene room with a domed ceiling. Most dishes are gently spicy, but you can specify your preferred hotness. Stunningly tender tandoori seabass (and a rich, slightly-sweet stew made from it, fish *masala*) is a house specialty. Vegetable entrées are also outstanding, particularly the sprightly navrattan korma, mixed veggies in a luscious nutty, creamy yogurt sauce. Other fine choices include tandoori lamb dishes, stir-fried prawns karahi, lamb pasanda, and eleven house-made Indian breads. All dishes plus fabulous bread, scones, muffins, available for take-out. Open daily 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

RANCHOS COCINA 1830 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-226-7619; 4705 Point Loma Avenue, Ocean Beach, 619-224-9815. Also at 3910 30th Street (at University), North Park, 619-574-1288. At all locations of this delightful mini-chain, you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: Zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak — in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an *antojito* stuffed with beef — it's stewed, not ground. And sample something with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, try anything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No reservations, but call ahead for large parties. Inexpensive. — N.W. (6/01)

TIN FISH Imperial Beach Pier, 910 Seacoast Drive, Imperial Beach, 619-628-8414, www.thetinfish.net. At a table by this fish shack at the far end of the pier, you can watch people and pigeons (and people feeding pigeons) as you dig into huge portions of simple seafood, appetized by the sea air. The bill of fare features fish — fried, grilled, chowdered, or wrapped into burritos, tacos, or sandwiches. The big fried combos are about what you'd expect, but more piquant pleasures come in smaller packages. (Portions are generous, whatever you order.) The oyster shooters, for instance, boast a sauce made from fresh diced tomatoes topped with horseradish. The spicy fish tacos are really spicy, while the fried onion rings are of surpassing delicacy. Best of all, the crab cakes are huge and seriously crabby, with plenty of meat and very little filler. Live music on weekends, good vibes all the time. "Tin Fish Shuttle" (50 cents) runs from parking lot to the restaurant. Open daily, breakfast (to 10:30 a.m.) through early dinner. A second branch at 170 Sixth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-8100, open daily lunch and early dinner, offers patio dining across from the Convention Center. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (7/01)

BERTA'S LATIN AMERICAN **RESTAURANT** 3928 Twiggs Street (at Congress, diagonal to Rockin' Baja Lobster), Old Town, 619-295-2343. Sampling the whole range of little-known cuisines from Guatemala down to Patagonia, Berta's lengthy menu reads like a culinary "pick hits" list of each country's best flavors, typically rendered with expertise and verve. Some outstanding dishes include sweet-savory Chilean pastel de choclo (a casserole of beef, chicken, and corn pudding) from Berta's homeland, spicy ceviche and subtle seco de cordero (cit-rus-flavored lamb stew) from Peru, earthy Guatemalan chilemal (cilantroladen pork stew), aromatic beef curry from Trinidad, and a sensuous *vatapa* (seafood in coconut sauce) from Brazil's African-influenced Bahia coast. Vegetarians will find many meat-andfowl-free options. Lunch and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

BLUE FIN GRILL 3770 Hancock Street (near Kurtz), Loma Portal, 619-692-1410. This blue and white cinder-block place hides out near the parking lot of the Sports Arena. It's crowded on Swap Meet weekends,

peaceful during the week. The inside is cheery blue, white, and woody, with a huge stuffed marlin on the wall. Try breakfast specials like hamburger steak with two eggs, home fries, and toast. Or nice light buttermilk hotcakes, two Or nice light buttermilk notcakes, two sausage links, and an egg. But the big draw is fresh Icelandic cod. You'll see the crew filleting the fish every morn-ing for their lunchtime special: fish and chips with salad. Grandma, who started the Blue Fin over 30 years ago, created the "secret" way of cooking them. Breakfast and lunch only, closed Mondays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

CAFE PACIFICA 2414 San Diego Avenue, Old Town, 619-291-6666. Superior standards always prevail here. The cooking is clean to the palate and bursting with freshness. For appetizers: Dungeness crab cakes or mussels steamed in chardonnay. For entrées, daily fresh fish, lamb chops, pasta. Everything is memorable. Not to be missed. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

HORSE AND COW BAR AND GRILL

2734 Lytton Street, Loma Portal, 619-224-6409. This hard-to-spot place "runs deep," like the customers it serves — submariners. Here is where the "Silent Service" lets off steam noisily. The H&C has probably the world's greatest collection of submarine memorabilia. Subs' banners, bells, lighters, even the deepest flush toilet in the world (it belonged to the USS *Dol*phin). The sub-like interior is dark, with walls painted camouflage blue-black. Snacks include mozzarella sticks, fried mushrooms, onion rings, chicken nuggets, and wings. If you're hungry, the flop-over-the-edge steaks and burgers with fries are generous. Not that it matters. What you're really digesting is the atmosphere. Open daily. ANTONIO'S HACIENDA 700 N. Johnson (corner of Arnele), El Caon, 619-442-9827. Fine place for children, parents, grandparents. The food is not regional or gourmet, but stan-dard items are fresh, generous in size, and inexpensive. Sopaipillas, a deepfried confection served with honey, are complimentary with meal. Open daily,













J-K'S GREEK CAFE 7749 University Avenue, La Mesa, 619-464-1915. This recently remodeled restaurant is a find for tasty, fresh, home-style Greek cooking. The marinated half-chicken, the oussaka, the pastitsio, and the souvlaki are authentically prepared, as are the hummus and ground beef and lamb. A Feast, for two people, includes moussaka, *pastitsio, dolmades*, gyros, pita, and Greek salad. Desserts — baklava, *kataifi*, and custard pie — are prepared on the premises. Takeouts available. Lunch and dinner, Monday through Saturday. Closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.W.

JIMMY'S 9635 Mission Gorge Road, Santee, 619-448-8994. We're at the end of the line here, the trolley's Orange Line. Feels like a safari. You walk back through the grass to the streets of Santee. Thank goodness for this family-friendly restaurant with good old-fashioned American food. Their six-page plastic menu tells all — forget your diet and dig into the breakfast "Eggs and Cakes" (two eggs, three pancakes), the "Touchdown" (two eggs, two hot cakes, four strips of bacon or three link sausages), or the "Monte Cristo" hot sandwich (ham and turkey grilled on batter-dipped Texas toast with Swiss cheese, hot syrup, and French fries). Or later in the day, the New York strip and sirloin steaks with all the trimmings, and desserts like homemade cinnamon

bread pudding with sultanas and whipped cream. Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

LA MESA OCEAN GRILLE AND SEAFOOD MARKET 5465 Lake Murray Boulevard, La Mesa, 619-463-1548. This spot is really three restaurants in one. One is a basic fish house with encyclopedic fish posters and paper place-mats, serving seafood sandwiches, tacos, and various simple fish preparations (fried, blackened, etc.). Another is an old-style seafood restaurant, with lace curtains, tablecloths, and some richer fish dishes (e.g., with hol-landaise). The third is a slightly hip Italian eatery with a charcoal-gray track-lit ceiling and black-background fish upholstery, serving standards (scaloppini, *piccata*, etc.) plus nightly specials. Fish here is very fresh and properly cooked, although there are occasional missteps — too much salt in the blackening, a hollandaise that tastes of lemony mayo. Salads are fresh but iceberg-standard; hot rolls are delicious sourdough, and the halibut ceviche is a treat — cool, refreshing and slightly tart. Baked Maryland-style crab cakes in a thick red-pepper sauce are gooeyrich and tasty. Moderate. — *A.M.* (5/01)

MARIO'S DE LA MESA 8425 La Mesa Boulevard, 619-461-9390. The man on the *burro* (seen on the restaurant's sign and menu) holds two flags, those of Mexico and the U.S.A. — very appropriate. Few dishes (except maybe the menudo) will push the paler palate too far in any direction, but gosh-all, everything is so darn tasty. Tamales are a house special: rich, pillowy clouds of cornmeal surrounding richer shredded pork scattered with raisins for a smidgeon of sweetness. Pork also gets loving treatment in the *carnitas rojas*, big chunks browned to the barest crisp, which falls away to melting tenderness. Great marinade (cumin?) on the carne asada; intense flavor and buttery richness on the "machaca sonora style (dry-roasted shredded beef). Beans are so light as to seem whipped; rice is studded with peas and spicy carrots. Service is fast and friendly. Sunday brunch. Inexpensive. — A.M. (7/01)

PEARLS OF THE SEA Sycuan Casino, 5469 Casino Way, El Cajon, 619-445-6002. In a quiet refuge from the bustle of the casino, you'll find refined Hong Kong versions of Chinese classics, skillfully prepared in the light Cantonese style. The menu ranges from low-priced noodle bowls (including a dynamite days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

Cantonese take on Filipino *pansit*) up to live Maine lobster and excellent Peking Duck served with beautiful little Man darin buns. The rear of the restaurant boasts live tanks, and if you love good seafood, do step back to choose your fish, which can be sensitively steamed, panfried, or deep-fried — your option. (BTW, a whole fish to feed a tableful runs less than a skimpy fillet at any fancy restaurant.) Since most gamblers want to gobble and run, tell the server immediately if you want your meal served in leisurely courses (as the food deserves). No alcohol. Reserve for weekends or large groups. Inexpensive, with a few large dishes and specialties at moderate prices. — N.W.~(6/01)

POTRERO'S CAFE 25125 Highway 94, Potrero, 619-478-2694. Watch for the three great old Live Oak trees. This café sits under them and looks straight out of a 1930s Western movie. Lot of good old boys in ten-gallon hats gather here. The menu's non-PC. It features rib-sticking food from biscuits and gravy to a mountain of hot cakes or the famous mushroom and onions ham-burger with baked beans. Great family country drive destination. Open for breakfast and lunch. Closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

SHMOOZERS KOSHER DAIRY **RESTAURANT** 6366 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-583-1636. Great for vegans! This Kosher eatery promises "all-rennetless cheese, vegetarian food, no meat, no animal fat, tarian food, no meat, no animal fat, certified Kosher, 100% fresh ingredients." Everything is prepared under the supervision of the "Va'ad Harabbonim of San Diego" — meaning, the restaurant is inspected every few days by an Orthodox rabbi to make sure the food is prepared properly. The milk is also checked — Chalav Yisroel — from milking to bottling. Good eats include "Felafel, California Style," balls of seasoned ground chickpeas, tahini

(sesame paste), and salad rolled in a flour tortilla; the 16-inch vegan pizza; and breaded whiting fillets with chips or salad. Open Saturday from one hour after sunset to 11 p.m.; Sunday to Thursday, noon-8:30 p.m.; closed Fri-

VALLEY HOUSE RESTAURANT 10767 Woodside Avenue, Santee 619-562-7878. This is for Cornbelt folks, plus wannabes who enjoy plainspeaking, plenty-of-it Iowan food. Take the morning special "Iowa Breakfast": breaded pork tenderloin, two eggs, and hash browns, fries, or grits plus a choice of biscuits, muffins, or toast — it's delicious. Lunch or dinnertime you can't go wrong ordering the signature "Iowa Porker" hot sandwich (breaded port tenderloin in a bun with soup, potato salad, or steak fries) or the "Iowa Beefers" (seasoned ground beef simmered in chicken broth, piled into a burger bun). Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

ANTIQUE ROW CAFE 3002 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-282-9750. Antique-land's favorite eatery is a serious exhibit in its own right, especially if you're into sports memorabilia. Look for signed photos of Mickey Mantle, Ted Williams, Joe DiMaggio (all googly-eyed with Marilyn) on the walls. The word for food: generous. All-day breakfast dishes include "The Works" omelet, stuffed with bacon, sausage, ham, bell peppers, onions, tomatoes, and cheese bulging over a big oval plate with skins-on breakfast potatoes doing the in-filling. "Philly Steak Heaven" (you choose: steak, ham, or turkey) is one of the more popular lunchtime dishes. Night choice: baked stuffed salmon. And conversation? The fun's in the buzz you overhear from antique dealers in nearby booths. Seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

CHICKEN PIE SHOP OF SAN DIEGO 2633 El Cajon Boulevard,

North Park, 619-295-0156, How much do people love this place? Count the chickens lining the walls - ceramic wood, beaded, painted, even feathered. Hundreds. They're gifts from generations of customers. Now, as in the 1930s when it started up, the basic chicken pie comes filled with big chunks of chicken meat, doused with white gravy and accompanied by mashed potatoes, veggies, coleslaw, a roll, and dessert — like the delicious pineapple pie — all for one really low price. The menu also offers fried chicken, burgers and steaks, but 90 percent of customers still order that same old chicken pie. Seven days. Cash only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/01)

MAMA'S BAKERY AND LEBANESE **DELI** 4237 Alabama Street, North Park, 619-688-0717. This informal little restaurant is more interested in quality than presentation, concentrating on the specialties they do well. Mama's offers quick meals with a culi-nary tradition, definitely not "fast food," but with fast food prices and ease. Recommendations include the deliciously cheap falafel sandwich in Mama's fresh-made *sajj*, (soft flatbread). On cool days warm up to a bowl of *fool mudamas*, or slow-cooked beans (tasty fava and garbanzos). Try also spinach pie, *labneh* (creamy cheese, olive oil, and pita), and baba ghanoush (smoky pureed eggplant and hummus). Inexpensive. — M.N. (1/99)

OLD MILL CAFE 3949 Ohio Street, North Park, 619-294-3804. The best-kept secret in North Park looks like a Swiss chalet inside, but serves 1950s American eats in big platefuls. Breakfast buffs should check out the pork chops with two eggs, potatoes, and toast, or biscuits and gravy, or the famous pigs in a blanket (three sausage links rolled in hot cakes with powdered sugar). The lunch and dinner menu is also good and cheap — for instance, golden fried chicken with vegetables and rice or baked potato. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

TRIEU CHAU RESTAURANT 4653 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-280-4204. This is as near as you'll come to eating breakfast in Phnom

Penh or lunch in Vientiane, Cambodians come in the morning to talk politics and play Cambodian chess. At lunch, Laotians replace them. Maps of "Kampuchea" decorate the walls, as well as long-distance telephone ads. The menu includes Chinese, Khmer, and Lao dishes. In the morning, ask for "djak kvai coffay dok ko" — fried bread with Cambodian coffee, the standard French-Khmer breakfast. Later in the day, you might try pan-fried noodles with broccoli and beef or shrimp and gravy ("koitiow bahat sai kho"). If in doubt, ask for Kathy, who speaks Chi-nese, Khmer, Lao — and English. THE ABBEY CAFE 127 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-692-0311, www.theabbevcafe.com. Based on the chi-chi West Hollywood original. Look for the wooden cross tied to the giant cactus. By all means go during the day and sit out on the patio. But the mustvisit time is after sunset, when they light the patio wall with thousands of candles (okay, 250 of them). Inside the 1910 house you eat in dark-wood rooms with (working) fireplace, church pew, metal chalices, black iron sconces, and stone cherubim. Pick from the all-day breakfasts (try the chicken breast, eggs, and fruit dish) or sandwiches if you're feeling cheap — or the Ahi Tuna New Orleans style (half a pound of fish) if you're more loaded. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (12/01)

CAFE ON PARK 3831 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-293-7275. Okay, it's trendy, from the rusty spoonand-fork sign at the door to the PC industrial interior (concrete walls, exposed plumbing). But don't expect PC



CALIFORNIA CUISINE 1027 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-543-0790. This Hillcrest restaurant has been around forever, has a durable reputation and an established clientele. Perhaps the flawless waitstaff working their sleek, calm dining room is the reason why. The menu is sensible, but the preparations uneven. The appetizers are interesting, but don't live up to their promise. It is California Cuisine's classic entrées that endure despite their menu's excessive range. I recommend the New York steak or lamb loin, accompanied by one of their clever salads. If you appreciate life's finer things, California Cuisine is a place for a good meal. Moderate to expensive. — M.N. (5/99)

THE GATHERING 902 West Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-260-0400. Be prepared for surprises: the owner-bartender is a professional magician who enjoys entertaining his diners. This neighborhood favorite is comfortable and the oblong bar at the center of the room seems straight out of *Cheers*. For Sunday brunch, it's a toss-up between the "Mission Hills Omelet" (snow crab sautéed in butter, sherry, and tarragon, with dilled-hollandaise sauce) and the "Goldfinch Omelet" (Canadian bacon

with sautéed mushrooms, onions, and hollandaise sauce). Open seven days, three meals. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

GULF COAST GRILL 4130 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-295-2244. www.gulfcoastgrill.com. Like its food — "Sassy southern and southwest cuisine" — the place has a brassy, planky, bollardy, pelicany, ropey, cozy, jokey Jimmy Buffet feel. And you can either eat rich ("Mississippi mustard catfish," "New-Orleans style BBQ shrimp," "Cajun Strip") or poor — if you hit the place during Happy Hour. Baja clam chowder, grilled vegetable quesadilla, cornmeal crusted brie cheese, fried oysters, and the BBQ baby back ribs are all great sunset bargains. Best Happy Hour seats: patio or bar. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (10/01)

HAMBURGER MARY'S 308 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-491-0400. All the action is on the patio, under ficus trees, ferns, the palapa bar, and white umbrellas. Bougainvillea bursts out of tables. Hamburger Mary's mural comes at you in a Stetson, wild red hair, big blue eyes, and a plump butt. Basically it's a gay rendezvous, but everybody's welcome. The burgers are way-big with funky titles, like the "I'm Sooo Bleu" burger with bacon and bleu cheese crumbles, or the "Two Tons Of Fun," a six-inch-high double-burger with mushrooms, bacon, lettuce, cheese, and onions. The kicker is they're all served between wickedly crisp, sweet slabs of golden Hawaiian bread. Moderate. — E.B. (3/01)

HOB NOB HILL 2271 First Avenue, Banker's Hill, 619-239-8176. It opened in 1944 as a 14-stool lunch counter. Now, you sweep in under the maroon canopy to shiny red booth seats, deep blue carpet, blond wood, paintings, and a half-wall of wine. You're thinking "business class," but don't be fooled. We're talking coffee-shop prices, especially with the all-day breakfasts and sandwiches, not to mention the burgers with a salad tossed in. Dinners (slightly more expensive) are also generous. Try chilled gazpacho, then pork chops, baked potatoes, and a dessert of

mince pie with mock brandy topping, all part of the deal. Also good: Sunday's roast leg of lamb. Open seven days. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (10/01)

JOE'S GRILL 3537 Fifth Avenue (inside Nunu's Cocktail Lounge), uptown, 619-295-2878. Nunu's is a bar with a history. It has always been a tuna fishermen's hangout. You still hear Italian and Portuguese in the mornings. But evenings, the neighborhood shows up, along with chefs and maitre d's from the Gaslamp, and the theater crowd—directors, actors, disciples. Most end up going to the hole in the back where Joe serves up his solid, no-nonsense nosh, from meat loaf to his half-pound mushroom-and-bacon cheeseburger to his much-loved pot roast. You won't leave hungry— unless you're timid. You have to shout good and loud through that cubbyhole. Joe's got a lot of noise back there. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/01)

KEMO SABE 3958 Fifth Avenue (off University), Hillcrest, 619-220-6802, www.kemosabesandiego.com. Audacity is Chef Deborah Scott's culinary signature. In her cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touches and towering heaps of garnishes. All the edible frou-frou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive chilpotle cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a picante marinade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the housestyle — skyhigh, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Reservations strongly advised. Prices moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

MIXX RESTAURANT 3671 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania), Hillcrest, 619-299-6499. A meal here resembles an informal dinner party at the home of a good, well-traveled cook. Fitly, the dining room resembles a bohemian living room on steroids, with moody decor, rump-sprung Naugahyde banquettes, and witty paintings on the walls. The menu is an international

hodgepodge of whatever chef-owner Deborah Helm fancies cooking: touristic Fisherman's Wharf crab-and-artichoke fondu in hollowed sourdough may cohabit with haute-Mex cremini mushroom quesadillas, "Indonesian" battered shrimp, or duck ragout with pasta sheets. Desserts (by Danielle Helm) carry through the "loving hands at home" theme — the most popular is a gooey peanut butter pie. A mainly California wine list is easy on both palate and wallet, with ample selections by the glass. Moderate. — N.W. (9/00)

MONTANAS AMERICAN GRILL 1421 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-297-0722. At this Southwestern American café you can easily make a meal from the first courses plus one of several salads. Pasta dishes are good choices. Smoked or grilled items include barbecue salmon, ribs, and skewered lamb. Venison chili or steak sandwich always a good bet. Pleasant atmosphere. Excellent service. Open daily. Lunch Monday through Friday. Dinners nightly. Inexpensive to upper moderate. — E.W.

ONO SUSHI AND PACIFIC SPICE 1236 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-0616. If you are searching for huge portions, fresh tasty food and reasonable prices, don't overlook this colorful Japanese/Pacific Rim café. Excellent specialty rolls, entrées, appetizers. Very crowded weekends; lively young crowd. Dinners nightly; open for lunch Saturday and Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.W. (11/98)

PARALLEL 33 741 West Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-260-0033. China, Pakistan, Algeria, Morocco, et cetera — the 33rd parallel. This new ethno-blend restaurant in Mission Hills is a hit for their shrewd, thoughtful creativity. It's not just "fusion food." Try the mango and ahi appetizer, one of the best I've ever eaten. Entrées like grilled salmon atop lobster tabbouleh or steak strips over mashed potato and caramelized onion show that chef Amiko Gubbins, of Café Japengo fame, thinks with her mouth. — M.N. (10/99)

TERRA 3900 Vermont (Uptown Center), Hillcrest, 619-293-7088, www.ter-

rasd.com. Co-owner Jeff Rossman, formerly in charge of the front of the house, has moved into the kitchen to serve as chef at this comfortable neigh-borhood spot, serving venturesome, if uneven, tropical-influenced American cooking. You can settle in a spacious southwest-tinged dining room or people-watch from a sheltered outdoor patio (with smoking permitted). Generously sized tapas can serve as appetizers or as a sustaining bite before venturing into Trader Joe's across the street. The dinner menu changes sea-sonally, featuring barbecue items during the summer, comforting fare in colder weather, and special dinners on all major holidays. Good wine list with several flights available, full bar with tropical cocktails (Pisco Sours, Caipirinhas, et al.). Reservations advised, especially for weekends, holidays and special events (e.g., Sunday "blues and barbecue" during the summer). Open daily for lunch or brunch, snacks, dinner. ACQUA AL 2 322 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp District, 619-230-0382, www.acquaal2.it. Despite its monicker, this isn't a seafood trattoria, but a nearfishless branch of a restaurant in Florence that won success by eschewing the standard Florentine menu, while maintaining Tuscan purity of style. Chef-owner Martin Gonzales trained there, and serves as charming host of the local outpost. Best bets are the vegetarian pasta and rice dishes made with aromatic porcini mushrooms. The tasting of five pastas may sound tempting, but they're chef's choice — and he tends to choose the dull ones. "Tast-

ings" of salads, cheeses and desserts are also offered. Mains are mainly rather plain. Moderate (pasta) to expensive.

Open for lunch Monday through Friday; dinner nightly, to 10:00 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Separate dining rooms for parties. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

825 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp District, 619-238-0101. The best Persian food in the city is prepared here. It's sensuous, low fat, and a blessing to the sight as well as the palate. Try stuffed grape leaves, yogurt, eggplant, charbroiled filet mignon, lamb, or chicken. Order all three kinds of rice. Enchanting interior, wonderful service. Not to be missed. Open daily, same menu lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.W.

BAY CAFE 1050 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-595-1083. If you're hungry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsome bay view terrace (with no wheelchair access). After a chilly crossing, try the enjoyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced potatoes. The menu features breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches, variations on fish and chips including prawns, and chili dogs (all served with generic fries), plus some entrée salads. The burgers are genuinely "have it your way" — for a few extra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mushrooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). BAYOU BAR AND GRILL 329 Market Street (at Third Street), Gaslamp District, 619-696-8747. Bayou has the most expansive (and expensive) Louisiana-style menu in the Gaslamp.











Their best dishes are terrific — for instance, their red beans and rice (the washday treat) is the area's sole authentic version, meaty and with a rich, deep heat. Eggplant dishes shine, too, as do seafood pastas and a huge pork chop with dressing. Alas, though, too many dishes are faux-Paul Prudhomme, with incoherent spicing and, at times, too much cayenne added too late in the cooking to cozy up to other flavors. Desserts are frankly, fabulously revisionist, including pecan pie and bread pudding half as heavy and twice and good as their Creole models. Reservations advisable. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. CANDELAS 416 Third Avenue, Gaslamp District, 619-702-4455. Don't look for tacos here: Chef Eduardo Baeza specializes in "la nueva cocina Mexicana," a luxurious, inventive update of traditional Mexican fare, combining French techniques and Latin ingredients into a sophisticated new cuisine that you've never tasted before but will want to taste again. In a romantic Spanish-style dining room with extremely gracious service, you'll find a menu that emphasizes seafood, including jumbo prawns flamed with three tequilas, sea bass with huitlacoche ("corn fungus," but think of it as a mushroom), and a signature dish of luscious stuffed Maine lobster. Meatlovers will also enjoy several dishes, including a thick veal chop with a rosemary-spiked update of traditional mole sauce. Reservations advised, slightly dressy. Expensive. — N.W. (11/00)

DOBSON'S 956 Broadway Circle, downtown, 619-231-6771. This reputable downtown restaurant offers class and comfort, geared for people who enjoy eating well. The food is good, often very good, as with chicken liver mousse pâté, Mediterranean blue mussels, culotte steak, and, when available, the crude but virtuous soft-shell crab. Their sweets, such as brownies and bananas Foster strudel, are hefty, louche, and cheap. Bring a date to the upstairs dining room. Dobson's is suave, its confidence infectious. Moderate to expensive. — M.N. (10/98)

EDGEWATER GRILL 861 W. Harbor Drive, Seaport Village, 619-232-7581 www.edgewatergrill.com. An easy walk from the Convention Center, the dining room is spacious and handsome, and the view from the crowded dining terrace is optimal (the bay, the Coronado Bridge, a park, etc.). The menu, though, is convention-centered — like a Howard Johnson's for the 21st century. The fare features middle-of-theroad faux-fusion salads, seafood, grilled steaks, pastas (most with shellfish), and individual pizzas, plus daily fin-fish dishes listed on a card in a plastic holder on the table. The lighter dishes are the most successful — this is not a bad place to "graze" on appetizers and a mini-pizza when you're starved for a view. Difficult wheelchair access to terrace. Open daily, breakfast through dinner, entrées high moderate to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

GEN LAI SEN HAKKA SEAFOOD RESTAURANT 1065 12th Avenue (at C Street), downtown, 619-239-5478 or 619-239-5479. Across the street from City College, you'll encounter a split personality. The good twin provides superb Hakka dishes, a style developed a nomadic people originally from northwest China, now residents of mainly the south China coast. The bad twin dishes out gluey cornstarch-ridden stir-fries for starving students. But it's easy to tell which twin is which: The 'chef recommend sizzle plates," the hot pots that taste like home cooking (best ordered by four or more), the greaseless fried rice, the noodles (especially "house special rice noodles"), and the whole steamed fish-of-the-day are palpable hits. And if you really want to know what the fuss about Hakka is all about, try the sizzle plate stuffed tofu these deep-fried crisp rectangles with a pork meatball inserted in each tender center resemble meat-flavored roasted marshmallows, and may just change your mind about bean curd. Open brunch through dinner daily. Pleasant service, very casual, mainly inexpensive. — N.W. (10/01)

GRAND CENTRAL CAFE YMCA, 500 West Broadway, downtown, 619-234-2233. A nice Broadway surprise — who'd expect the "Y" to have

terrific meals? But Grand Central tries hard. The breakfasts are big and filling, and the lunch chili with salad and cheese toast is a tasty bargain. So is the veggie-burger with fries, coleslaw, soup, or salad. Plus you can look down onto Broadway and check when your boss is returning to work. Breakfast/lunch weekdays, breakfast only weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

HARBOR HOUSE 831 W. Harbor Drive, Seaport Village, 619-232-1141. The two-level building and the view of the harbor are major attractions. Fish and seafood predominate but chicken, pasta, and steak are also available. The dining room seats 250, so don't expect intimacy. Preparations are wholesome but not original. Open daily. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

JUKE JOINT CAFE 327 Fourth Avenue (across from Cost Plus), Gaslamp District, 619-323-7685, www.jukejoint-cafe.com. This is the closest we've got to a good, funky jazz club in New Orleans' Uptown neighborhood (but the Gaslamp is lots safer). They call their cooking "West Coast Soul Food," but it's still mighty South Coast, too, including a just-about perfect filé gumbo, thick and rich, flavored with genuine Louisiana sausage. Good jambalaya, fried foods (try fried pickles and gizzards for a down-home treat), huge steaks, and live music for a hip crowd make this a tasty scene. Full bar. Reservations strongly advised. No cover charge with dinner. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (3/01)

LA CASITA 1247 C Street (corner of 13th and C), downtown, 619-531-0044. Don't be fooled by the li'l old blue and white clapboard house at the bottom of City College's hill. Princes and politicians come here to hammer out deals, mix with the Latino (or Anglo) community, and eat some of the best chorizo con huevos (spicy pork sausage with eggs) in town. In the cozy Mexican-style interior, the pictures on the walls tell you who-all comes here for the good tacos and enchiladas, or the delicious pork burritos. Most delicious of all is watching Anglo City-Hallers trying valiantly to learn to love the

house-made *menudo* (tripe soup). —

LEE'S CAFE 738 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp District, 619-239-1621. This beautiful place is a thorn between two roses. Located mid-Gaslamp with luxury Euro-ristorantes on either side — heh heh — here a big plate of baked chicken, or chicken-fried steak, or baked ham, with gravy, potatoes, veggies, rice, salad, bread and butter — and macaroni and egg flower soup go for almost nothing. Breakfast is a bargain too, offering sausages, eggs, hash browns, and all the coffee you want. "Uncle Lee started 40 years ago," says Lily, who runs it. God bless Uncle Lee. Open 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

NAPA VALLEY GRILLE 502 Horton Plaza, Gaslamp District, 619-238-5440. This new restaurant at the top of Horton Plaza is staffed by professionals, and the food is very, very good. I suggest the calamari plate, and the rotisserie-roasted chicken or pork are both moist and delicious. Their monkfish is a deeply satisfying Southern delight. Try the airy, sweet goat cheese cheesecake for dessert. There is an elegant homeyness to Napa Valley Grille, a comforting, satisfying dining experience. Moderate to expensive. — M.N. (3/00)

OSTERIA PANEVINO 722 Fifth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp District, 619-595-7959. At this Tuscany-style Italian restaurant, the appetizers and pastas are as close to heaven as you can get, particularly the spinach ravioli and potato gnocchi in a four-cheese sauce. The stuffed focaccias are simply incredible, and the pizzas are well-nigh perfect. The exposed brick walls enhance the European feeling. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive, wines rather high. — *E.W.* (4/00)

REDFISH 731 Fifth Avenue (at G), Gaslamp District, 619-234-7226, www.redfishamerica.com/sandiego.html . At this sprawling New Orleans-style restaurant/nightclub (one of a small national chain), the varied music playing over the speakers before showtime is consistently tasty. Alas, one can't say

the same for the cooking, so order with care. Best dishes include a rich, smoky crawfish etouffée, interesting okra gumbo, and mainly-decent salads and appetizers. But authenticity and taste go blazes in a tomatoey jambalaya with the flavor of bottled spaghetti sauce, and in several dishes (BBQ shrimp, dirty rice, etc.) so fiercely spicy, the kitchen might be catering a frat hazing. Smartly (given this impetus to chug-alug), they make their tasty Hurricane cocktails a little weak. Moderate, plus evening cover charge. — N.W. (3/01)

SALLY'S RESTAURANT One Market Place, rear of Hyatt Regency Hotel, Gaslamp District, 619-687-6080. You'll get great fish here as well as free-range chicken, lobster, and beef. Try Arctic char, loin of tuna, swordfish. Side dishes tend to be elaborate. Dinners for 6 to 12 served at chef's table in the kitchen. Open daily. Expensive. — *E.W.*

SIXTH AVENUE BISTRO 1165 Sixth Avenue (at B Street), downtown, 619-239-4194. This charming, airy café offers some very credible New Orleansstyle cooking at affordable prices. Among the sandwiches are an outstanding oyster po' boy (with big juicy oysters and good light batter) and a fine, fully-packed approximation of a muffaletta, albeit with a kaiser roll standing in for Central Grocery's big round Italian bread. The mix-it-yourself jambalaya is tasty, too, even if kielbasa proves a lame substitute for chaurice or andouille. Wine and beer. No reservations, breakfast to early dinner (closes 8:00 p.m.). Inexpensive. — N.W. (3/01)

SPICE HOUSE CAFE 1401 Ninth Street (at Ash), downtown, 619-239-8510. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hang-Over Omelet. We don't know if it's the Ortega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. The place is a pleasant surprise jutting out into the top foliage of trees sprouting up from Hwy. 163 — the view looks like a forest. Other excellent choices in-

clude Portuguese sausage with three eggs, paisano frittata with ham, tomatoes, mushrooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped cream. Breakfast and lunch, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

TRATTORIA PORTOBELLO 715 Fourth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp District, 619-232-4440. The owners of Panevino operate this chic restaurant with its light menu and wide variety of dishes. You can make a meal from appetizers. The pastas are the best bets. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Expensive. — *E.W.*

WILDSIDE CAFE & REBEL JUICE BAR 1048 Seventh Avenue, downtow 619-696-1466. Now here's a place that actually makes healthy food seem cool. Partly it's the names: "lunatic lentil soup," sandwiches like "turkey tantrum" (roast turkey with salsa), "tuna scandal" (tuna mushed with egg whites and no-fat mayo), or our two favorites, "veggies on a bike" (cucum-bers, spinach leaf, tomatoes, red onion) and "bagel without a cause" (bagel cream cheese, fresh fruit). Actually all come with fresh fruit. And do like the local lofties: take your daily shot of fresh-squeezed wheat grass juice with a chaser of strawberries or pineapple chunks. Open Monday through Friday. Hours vary seasonally. Inexpensive. E.B. (9/01)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

BAY BEACH CAFE Ferry Landing Marketplace, 1201 First Street, Coronado, 619- 435-4900, www.baybeach-cafe.com. The dinner menu here has California's typical dumbed-down world-appetizer array, plus salads, pastas, grilled meats, a few sautée items and children's plates. The restaurant is very family-friendly (full o' kids, actually), with a menu that appeals to the young in mouth: The chef seems to have a sweet tooth, since almost every dish involves honey or sugar — from the table butter that's intriguingly flavored with a honey-basil mixture to the

"teriyaki" ribs in a glutinous Karo-like sauce. Your server will tell you about the day's fresh fish selections, which are more attuned to adult palates with fresh, fine-quality seafood done simply and well. Ultra-noisy inside when crowded; reserve for the lovely terrace with a view of the beach. Open daily, lunch and dinner, with weekend breakfast. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

CHEZ LOMA 1132 Loma Avenue (at Orange Avenue), Coronado, 619-435-0661. The historic aura of this cute period bungalow remains seductive, but the "French" menu is mired in the more recent past, circa 1970. Some appetizers are sprightly, but entrées are inconsistent and can be indifferently executed with subpar ingredients, e.g., a cassoulet de mer may pair undercooked white beans with overcooked seafood of questionable quality. Some best bets are Irvine's signature dishes of salmon with a mild barbecue sauce and roast duck with a trio of sauces. Veggie accompaniments (swampy reheated tasting rice, limp carrots, soggy sugarsnaps) bear an eerie resemblance to Lean Cuisine. Early bird bargain-priced dinners. Reservations advised. Fairly expensive but not dressy. — N.W. (6/01)

THE FAMILY HOUSE OF PANCAKES 562 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-425-5133. This is a great place for three things: your family, your kids, and your appetite. The restaurant is famous for its "Grandma's" buckwheat pancakes, its banana-pecan pancake, and its rolled pancakes, oozing with berries and topped with cream and powdered sugar. Just try and survive their 8-12 egg omelet! Other good bets include a deluxe burger with French fries, tomatoes, and house sauce, and a grilled tuna sandwich with fries. Breakfast/lunch only, 6:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

GALLEY AT THE MARINA 550 Marina Parkway, Chula Vista, 619-422-5714. This is a great place to relax, take in the view and decide which yacht you're gonna buy when you win the lotto. It's run by Fran Muncey, widow of Bill Muncey, San Diego's greatest speedboat-racing champion. The tasty, bargain-priced happy hour specials (3:00 to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday) make a visit worth the trip west of 1-5: try a 1/2-pound steerburger with French fries, chicken caesar salad with sourdough toast, or a filet mignon steak plate with steak fries. Next morning, catch the breakfast favorite: biscuits and sausage gravy with eggs. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

SLAND PASTA 1202 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-4545. This unassuming, spill-out-on-the-street restaurant has somehow got it right. Simple tables on the sidewalk, daily made-on-the-premises semolina pasta, most dishes costing in the single digits. A simple fettuccine Alfredo is a pleasure al fresco with a glass of wine, sparkling against the fresh flowers on the table, watching Coronado's world go by. The spaghetti pesto sauce is rich, too, with basil, pine nuts, and cheese, but all the standard Italian pasta and pizza dishear er eliable. One good — and vegetarian — special to ask for is the verdure pasta, a combo of artichoke hearts, spinach, capers, mushrooms, onions and olives over spaghettini. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

L'ESCALE Coronado Island Marriott Resort, 2000 Second Street, Coronado, 619-435-3000. This is the casual dining room that faces the pool at this firstrate hotel. Menus are constantly changing, so call to discover what type of cuisine is available. Jazz night on Friday and Saturday evening, with dinner specials. Open daily, breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

PRIMAVERA 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454. This standout in Coronado's culinary scene offers courtly charm and an impressive menu. Try their saffron risotto, clams bordelaise, or the delicious ossobuco, of which every detail is accomplished, admirable. For dessert, have one of their excellent espressos and the tiramisu or lemon ricotta cake. Primavera's accomplished staff takes unpretentious pride in their kitchen, the food and wine they serve, and rightfully so. Open daily. Expensive. — *M.N.* (11/98)

RHINOCEROS 1166 Orange Avenue (at Loma Avenue), Coronado, 619-435-2121. This bright, hectic bistro next door to the Lamb's Players Theatre draws pre-theatre crowds as well as locals — and that may be a problem, since the rushed pace of service doesn't abate even after the playgoers have departed. Perhaps that's why there are few appetizer choices (as though to discourage diners from spending extra time at the table). You may even be charged a "split plate" fee for sharing a first course despite ordering individual entrées. Meat and fish choices are sim ply prepared with ingredients of ordinary quality and generic veggie accompaniments. Why, then, is Rhino so popular? Pasta (and nothing but pasta) is the answer — that's where the kitchen shines. Very noisy when crowded; street tables are slightly quieter despite heavy traffic. Reservations advised for weekends, pre-show dinners. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. - N.W. (7/01)

SPIRO'S GYROS Ferry Landing, 1201 First Street #4, Coronado, 619-435-1225. The food, the music, the view — are we outside Athens? Is this the Aegean? This inside-outside Greek café is located at the water's edge, and the heated patio has a spectacular view of San Diego, the bay, and the boat traffic. At sunset, sipping their excellent Greek wine (cheaper than their California), watch the sun set the city ablaze in gold. The prices keep Spiro's popular with the locals as well as tourists. Try the moussaka (eggplant casserole) or the souvlakia chicken, marinated in *tzatziki* sauce, served with tomatoes, onions, and pita bread. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

STRETCH'S CAFE 943 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-8886. Stretch got his name in World War II when he was 6'1" and 135 pounds. Now he wants to get back to that — and he

wants you to, too, so he serves strictly nuts and twigs. His menu includes veggie salad, chicken breast and beans over brown rice, or a plate frankly named "Steamed Veggies," featuring carrots, zucchini, broccoli, mushrooms, and melted cheese on brown rice. You'll come out feeling so proud that you resisted the greasy Slamburger at Danny's bar next door. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

TANGO GRILLE ARGENTINE STEAK HOUSE 635 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-0384. Play gaucho and enjoy the most authentic Argentine parrillada (mixed grill) in town at this charming, warmly-decorated bistro about two minutes from the Chula Vista Shopping Center. Fine, smoky wood-grilled Colorado beef appears in several unusual cuts (including succulent steak-cut short-ribs) and the savory sausages are flown in from Buenos Aires. You can choose from two different mixed grills (sized for one or two), the first with conventional meats, the other — the more adventurous includes organ meats and blood sausage. For starters, there are brilliantly seasoned mini-empanadas of amazing lightness, as well as several in-teresting salads. Those not in a grilledmeat mood can opt for numerous pas-tas (including a big, meaty lasagna) or the ubiquitous *milanesa* (breaded beef or chicken patties) of the pampas. Portions are more than generous, and so are the flavors. Low moderate. — N.W. (8/01)

TOMATOES PLUS: A CALIFORNIA BISTRO 4346 Bonita Road, Bonita, 619-479-8494. Here's a low-cost California-cuisine restaurant with very friendly atmosphere, very good preparations for the money, and a menu that offers 15 entrée salads, 15 pasta entrées, and nightly specials. You can make a meal from chili or homemade soup served in a bowl made from bread, or any of the excellent salads. Pasta dishes arrive with soup or salad. The homestyle soup is a knockout. Nonfat or low-fat oils used in cooking. Great fun. Open daily, breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.W.

CAFE LA ESPECIAL 718 Avenida Revolución, between Calle 3 and Calle 4, Tijuana, 685-6654. Robust tacos, enchiladas, chiles rellenos, tamales, egg dishes, and steak have been prepared at this unpretentious but good café for decades. La Especial is a favorite for families who want to eat at low cost. The stairway leading down to the dining room opens on Revolución, and the covered bazaar that extends beyond is a prime tourist attraction. Shafts of sun penetrate the dark of an incredible kitchen of great black iron stoves and giant steaming pots, and hoods gathering into black pipes that snake up and out through the roof. But what a welcome! As you walk through the mercado, ladies bounce up, enticing you away to their eateries. Hang in there till you reach Loncheria La Poca Lucha, "The Small Struggle Lunch Place." Ask for carne de puerco (pork), chiles rellenos, bisteck ranchero, or higado al gusto (liver), all around \$3. Pescado frito (fried fish), milanesa con papas (veal with fries), pollo frito (fried chicken), and carne asada are slightly more. Price includes soup, steaming hot corn tortillas, and a soda. Open seven days, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

RICA TORTA Ninos Heroes Avenue, No. 890, between 2nd and 3rd Streets (opposite Dorian's department store), Tijuana, 685-8579. This café may have the best tortas (call them Mexican-style hamburgers) in Tijuana. Six-inch rashers of marinated carne asada, slices of ham, squares of cheese, chopped salad, tomato slices, fresh-scooped avocado... it's a double-wide, double-high burger. The menu has 16 different kinds of tortas, from chorizo with eggs to beefsteak ranchero, all served in huge, three-ribbed, crisp-toasted Mexican bread buns. Everyone's well-dressed, with lots of ties and careful make-up (not on the same person, of course). Several concessions, including Tortas y Burritos Tonka, Armando's, and Panaderia Diego deliver cheap, standard Amero-Mexican. But come for the sound of 600 people like you, all chatting like crazy (in Spanish). Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

VALLARTA NATURAL 1252 Boulevard Agua Caliente, Tijuana, 686-1560. Vallarta Natural makes travel to Tijuana appetizing, serving only the healthiest, freshest ingredients. The kitchen makes its own bread and rolls, soy chorizo, vegetable stock, and gluten daily. Recommended are goblets of fresh juice, caldo Tlalpeño soup, taquitos panzones (soft tacos) filled with sautéed mushrooms or soy chorizo, tostadas, and especially milanesa. The milanesa is made from fresh gluten and is almost indistinguishable from veal: breaded, fried, it is delicious. Cool, clean, pleasant atmosphere. Open daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (9/98)

ut of kindness, generosity, even fellow Americanism, we must remind ourselves that *Collateral Damage* was one of those movies postponed from its autumn release date in the aftermath of September 11. It would be

terrible to think of it as some sort of considered "response" to the events of that day. This

is exactly the type of movie the pundits had instantaneously hoped out loud that Hollywood would be shamed into no longer making.

Arnold Schwarzenegger plays a fearless firefighter ("All right, guys. Heads up. Let's do it"), not as a heartfelt tribute to the FDNY, or even conversely as an opportunistic cashingin on previous such tributes, but for the simple reason (whatever it is) that a five-year-old boy announces that that's what he wants to be when he grows up. And it is just the luck of the draw that the terrorist who blows up the hero's wife and son is South Amercode name, El Lobo — instead of Middle Eastern. Oh, well. Win some, lose some. Firefighter hero: ripped from today's headlines. South American terrorist: yesterday's news.

Conviction is not something you need waste any time looking for. Calculation is everywhere. The brief glimpse of Happy Home Life — the aging Schwarzenegger, now in his midfifties, soaping himself in the shower

with his toddler son, looking for all the world as though he's advertising the latherability of Zest — and the ten-

der wave from a block away at the very moment the wife and child are blown to smithereens (the star is saved from having to act a reaction when he immediately gets bowled over by a taxicab) are tacked on at the outset only because the filmmaker, Andrew Davis of Chain Reaction, The Fugitive, Under Siege, Above the Law, can't trust to the viewers' imagination. How will they know how big a tragedy this is unless "Amazing Grace" is rendered on bagpipes at graveside?

The dialogue traffics in similar rudiments: "You cannot take the law into you own hands," "You cannot negotiate with terrorists" (well, you can and you can't), etc. Schwarzenegger, who really is getting too old for this kind of thing, signals his implacability with a patented one-eyed squint —





this is why they pay him the big bucks—as if sighting down a Winchester. And the true identity of El Lobo is a "surprise" only because—or only *if*—the spectator has become inured to, resigned to, the improbabilities in the plotting up to that point. (Sure: the collagen-lipped, supermodel-cheekboned peasant wife of the terrorist will

switch sides once she gets to meet an American in person, once she sees his humanity up close. Why not?) It is no surprise from any angle that each of the chief villains will need to be killed twice: par for the course. The cynicism about governmental agencies and the veneration of the lone vigilante mark the movie definitively as be-

longing to the world of pre-September 11. We're still waiting to see how much, or whether, that world has changed in the eyes of Hollywood.

Rollerball begins at dawn's first light with a nice quiet distant hilltop silhouette of bikers, a van, a pantomimed conference of some sort. It is

the last nice thing in the movie. Even if the ensuing scene of two young daredevils in a luge-on-wheels race down the streets of San Francisco could be seen as a good idea, the heavy-metal accompaniment to it could not also be seen as good - not if the filmmaker wants to retain the status of an observer in preference to that of an all-out accomplice, a panderer to the youth crowd, a Nike-licker. It especially can't be seen as a good idea if the filmmaker entertains pretensions as an above-it-all commentator on the exploitation of violence by crass capitalists.

The original Rollerball of 1975, from a William Harrison short story, was perfectly awful science fiction, although events in the interim might seem to have strengthened its credentials as a crystal ball: one thinks of the TV-driven phenomena of Xtreme sports (my keyboard groans at the spelling), the X Games, the XFL, the WWF, etc., not to mention such contrived "reality" shows as Survivor and Fear Factor. But then again, the original, despite positing a far-off world without war, was not so much looking to the future as to the contemporary reality of roller derby. (To which, whatever happened?) That connection is now lost, so that John McTiernan's remake seems to concern itself less with an unforeseen future than with a forgotten past. And let us recollect, too, that long before Survivor and Fear Factor, there was the modest nonsense of Beat the Clock.

As a tacit admission of its lack of prescience, though not quite an admission of its antiquation, the new version is set less far (if at all) in the future, and has been transplanted to Central Asia as a cover for any life-ischeap inhumanity. The game itself is still an incoherent mess: when we're told that in the championship round no penalties will be called, it's as startling to us as to the players because we hadn't realized that penalties were being called. An actual heavy-metal band — and for all I could tell, the same one that backed up the urban luge — provides live accompaniment to the game action. The complicity, there, is out in the open.

Had the filmmaker's posture as an anti-violence advocate not been sickening enough already, the revolutionary zeal of the finale sticks a finger all the way down your throat. We can look to John McTiernan to head up a revolution just as soon as Donald Trump takes a vow of poverty. The insignificant fact that the movie identifies with the exploited and manipulated hero (Chris Klein, groomed as a new Keanu Reeves) instead of with the exploitive and manipulative Mr. Money Bags (Jean Reno, a goddam furriner) only shows that Hollywood knows on which side its bread is buttered. The mass audience wants to identify with an action hero, not with an artist in a chair. And at least to the extent of his exploitation and manipulation, the identification is no problem.

In Big Fat Liar, a ruthless film producer steals a kid's English composition and transforms it into his next blockbuster: a dose of Hollywood self-loathing for the whole family. There's no harm in it, surely, and

plenty of pep. Paul Giamatti, in the part of the producer, slathers the relish on the hot dog. And two TV teens, Frankie Muniz and Amanda Bynes, evoke (yet scarcely eclipse) memories of a young Mickey Rooney and Hayley Mills (or else a pre-possession Linda Blair). But I must confess it was a peculiar experience for me to hear the names Shepherd and Duncan — surnames of the fourteen-year-old hero and the black studio chief - spoken on a movie screen in such close proximity and with such nagging frequency. It made me turn up my jacket collar and shrink a little lower in my seat.

It is time once again — February 14 through 24 — for the San Diego Jewish Film Festival, challenging me to find a new way to say that I can have nothing to say. I have next to no acquaintance with these films: dramatic features, documentaries, and shorts from around the globe, but roughly half of them home-grown. (Call 858-362-1348 or 858-362-1365 for full details.) It has not escaped my notice, however, that the festival, after expanding last year from its base at AMC $\,$ La Iolla to a satellite at Hazard Center, has now expanded further to two satellites in North County: the La Costa 6 and the Poway 10. The festival has always had a strong feeling of community, regardless of how strong the films. If it can spread that feeling, it will have done a service. ■

Ali — Will Smith's impression of the selfproclaimed "Greatest," né Cassius Marcellus Clay. For entertainment purposes, it can't touch Billy Crystal's impression of him. (Though, for those same purposes, there can be no quibble with Jon Voight's Howard Cosell: a glued-on nose as phony as the hairpiece.) The two-and-a-half-hour skim through the prime of his life, from the first Liston fight through the Foreman (shy of the third Frazier fight, the "Thrilla in Manila," worthy of an entire movie unto itself), is processed through Michael Mann's cinematic Mixmaster: desaturated color, gilded color, frosted color, blue-rinsed color; Steadicam, unsteady cam, bob-andweave cam, float-like-a-butterfly cam, These stylistic pretensions, coupled with the historical-sociological-cultural-epical pretensions, dampen what might have been an agreeable stroll down Memory Lane in the company of one of the great sports figures of the 20th Century. Amélie — Cutesy art-house item looks at the world (at Paris, more precisely) through the primrose-colored glasses of Jean-Pierre Jeunet: a delayed-meeting romance à la And Now My Love, Sleepless in Seattle, et al., and a fashionable juggling act of fate, chance, coincidence, etc. The dementedly winsome heroine (Audrey Tatou), prone to conspiratorial glances at the camera, and egged on by a waggish narrator, is a selfdenying do-gooder whose secret mission seems to be the spiritual enlightenment of others, often by the most devious means: reprogramming a speed-dial button from "Mother" to "Psychiatric Helpline." The boundless, bounding imagination tends to be grounded, however, by the air of effortfulness. The best of it — the broad omniscient view of humanity combined with an eye for random trivial detail — was done

better, and funnier, in Jane Campion's apprentice work, Passionless Moments, and at about one-tenth the length. With Mathieu Kassovitz. 2001.

Black Hawk Down - Faithful re-enactment of a 1993 incident in Somalia: the eighteen-hour urban firefight that ensues when an intended neat, clean, in-and-out raid into the heart of Mogadishu (colloquially called "the Mogue," or just "Mogue") goes bad. It delivers a mixed experience, even, you might say, a mixed message: harrowing yet spectacular action, unglamorous yet gorgeous, rugged yet slick. The director is Ridley Scott (Alien, Blade Runner, and on down through G.I. Jane and Gladiator), so the spectacular, the gorgeous, the slick are givens; the harrowing, the unglamorous, and the rugged must be counted as bonuses, neither to be taken for granted nor taken lightly. (The damage done to the bodies of some of the soldiers goes well beyond indignity.) Though some of the faces — Josh Hartnett, William Fichtner, Ewan McGregor, Ron Eldard, and that latter-day Aldo Ray, Tom Sizemore — are more familiar than others, there has been a concerted effort to steer clear of big stars, and to spread the dramatic interest evenly among the sizable cast: no one-manarmies, no centers-of-the-universe, no empathy-magnets, in this group. There is individual courage on display, and competence, and selflessness, but there is no villainy or cowardice deeper than the inevitable snafu. The soldiers are just that and no more: followers of orders. The virtual and inexplicable absence of blacks among them — the total absence among the principal ones perhaps creates an unwanted and unfortunate Zulu-like image of a handful of civilized whites holding the line against hordes of savage blacks. But there appears to be no conscious point of view apart from the dizzying spectacle of it all, the sensory overload, the nonstop assault on eye and ear, the swirl of dust and bits of paper beneath the churning blades of the helicopters, the trails of smoke, the explosions, the spray of debris — in sum, the big wow. Yet there are moments of genuine power, not to mention genuine skill. So, yes — a mixed experience, but an intense one, an exhausting one, and, most importantly, a lingering


Charlotte Gray — The title is colorless on purpose. But by the end — and quite precisely in the meaningful curtain line it acquires a richness of shade and tint. The heroine will by then, in the common phrase, have shown her true colors. An oldfashioned, grandly romantic WWII espionage thriller (vaguely reminiscent of the Melanie Griffith mush-pile, Shining Through: nothing reticent about that title!), it sets forth a modest definition of heroism, a capability that meets a need, an opportunity that rises to a duty. Our heroine, a young Scotswoman, has been spied (so to put it) by a nondescript Graham Greene-y civil servant in a railway car, where she chances to be reading Stendahl in the original French, a skill worth recruiting for use in the war office. In the meantime, her blazing affair with an RAF flier is interrupted when his plane gets shot down over France. It is her own idea that her language facility might be put to even better use in occupied territory. Maybe she will be able to pick up her lover's scent in the bargain. The Australian director, Gillian Armstrong, brings the proverbial woman's touch to this feminist adventure story, this internal odyssey, this journey of self-discovery. (She

never dwells on the physical action, the sporadic violence. She is much more interested in choices and consequences.) Personal identity is at the heart of the story and what better framework for such a subject than a spy yarn in which the protagonist is called upon to assume a false identity, and comes eventually to the realization that the false is the true? The spy genre and the character study benefit mutually from the arrangement. The espionage gains some psychological depth. Dry psychology gains the poetry of metaphor. 



Or at least — in a pet expression of an Evelyn Waugh character — up to a point. (Bob Balaban, who plays the producer, also happens to share the story credit with Altman.) The director's democratic inclinations, sometimes indistinguishable from his misanthropic inclinations, come out clearly in the casting, seeing to it that the servants (Helen Mirren, Emily Watson, Kelly Macdonald, Eileen Atkins, Alan Bates, Derek Jacobi, Clive Owen, Rupert Grant) are as stellar as their masters (Kristin Scott Thomas, Maggie Smith, Michael Gambon, Jeremy Northam, Charles Dance, James Wilby). Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone — The children's book by


J.K. Rowling, now a movie by Chris Columbus — maker of, among others, Adventures in Babysitting, Home Alone, Mrs. Doubtfire, Nine Months, Stepmom, and Bicentennial Man, chief rival of Steven Spielberg for his in-touchness with the Inner Child. No longer applicable, quite plainly, will be the line of defense to the effect that, however good or bad it might be, the kids at least are reading it, reading something. Even if you haven't read it yourself, you can infer a slavish fidelity to the text on the grounds that no special-effects movie, no "event" movie, no movie scored by John Williams, would otherwise keep so leisurely and strung-out a schedule of dramatic incident. It's more a matter of going new places and meeting new people (or new owls, goblins, trolls), a social schedule. The bespecta-cled little hero, if you didn't know, is a putupon orphan who, on reaching his eleventh birthday, and despite the interference of an abusive adoptive family of Dickensian grossness, discovers that he is a naturalborn wizard and is eligible for admittance into Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, there to develop his infinite inner potential. In short, he is a close cousin to every neglected, unappreciated, unloved, scorned, mocked, but ultimately (sweetly, revengefully) triumphant hero out of Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tales. In the end, his plodding path will lead him to a confrontation with the evil entity who slew his parents. But this destination is not signposted with the efficiency or urgency of a Hamlet (for instance). Maybe admirers of the book will be content with what amounts to an ancillary text of lavish illustrations. Still, it's not the, or a, book. More bluntly, it's not anything special. 

Nelson, No: Sean Penn's impression of a mental defective, complete with a new whisk-broom haircut to add to his tonsorial portfolio, no doubt offers many rewards, not the least of which is the license to laugh with impunity at the less fortunate. It is somewhat reminiscent, in its levels of observational detail and skill in mimicry, of Mickey Rooney's memorable performance in the made-for-TV Bill. But what kept the earlier film from the threshold of queasiness was its lower dramatic pressure, its lighter mood. So perhaps, on second thoughts, it might be more reminiscent of John Malkovich's Lenny in Of Mice and Men. The storvline here, as there, is fashioned for nothing other than to torture the character and spectator alike, to wrest pain from the one and pity from the other. The titular Sam is the single dad of a normally bright, abnormally cute little girl who, nearing her eighth birthday, has already caught up with and outdistanced the mental capacity of her father. When a social worker takes an interest in the situation takes the daughter away from the father it's not because the movie, too, is interested in the situation, but because it is interested, as mentioned, in torture. The whole brutal business is almost a sort of Saturday Night Live gag on a cinematic "heart-tugger" -They wouldn't let his daughter come out and play with him anymore! — except that it goes on and on, and no punch line ever arrives. (Small mercy: at least it isn't Robin Williams in the part of the permanent child.) 

The Majestic — An apolitical blacklisted screenwriter (Jim Carrey, pining after the Oscar that got away) hits the road to nowhere, drives off a bridge into the river, knocks his head, and wakes up on the beach with amnesia, right outside a California town where he happens to be a dead ringer for a WWII casualty — son of the local theater owner — whose body happened never to be found. Talk about convenient! After that, it's a soggy slog through lostlove tearjerking, postwar flag-waving, anti-McCarthy piety, nostalgia for small towns and old movies and neon. Sort of a chopped salad of Hail the Conquering Hero, The Return of Martin Guerre, Guilty by Suspicion, Cinema Paradiso, and (explicitly) The Life of Emile Zola. The man with two false fronts — neither a commie nor a war hero - is buried in false sentiment. Director Frank Darabont's only degree of restraint (there's no quota on nose-to-thescreen closeups) is to cut it half an hour shorter than the three hours of his Green Mile. With Martin Landau, Laurie Holden, David Ogden Stiers, James Whitmore, Bob Balaban, Ron Rifkin. 2001.

Mansfield Park — Drawing on Jane Austen's life, letters, journals, and maybe even mystique in addition to the novel itself, writer-director Patricia Rozema projects the author onto the heroine to a de-

gree that no novelist worth her salt would abide. (And Austen was a novelist worth her salt and her pepper, too.) The upshot is that Fanny Price receives a transfusion of social awareness and free-spiritedness ("Fanny Price! Will you please try to act with some decorum?"), not to mention literary ambition and all-around moxie, such that a present-day feminist might overcome the long-standing reservations about the character — her primness, her meekness, her submissiveness, her self-pity — and "identify" with her more fully. Rozema

(I've Heard the Mermaids Singing, When Night Is Falling), apart from projecting Austen onto the character, could be suspected of projecting herself as well. Yet, for all the filmmaker's modernness in attitude and boldness in its expression, she yields nothing to the original Fanny, the Fanny on the page, in pious judgmentalism. Nowhere is this more apparent than in her exposé of Sir Thomas's involvement in the West Indies slave trade, and her acknowledgment of Fanny's forward-looking PC view of it. The benevolent patriarch is thus transmogrified into a figure of irremediable repulsiveness and hypocrisy. (Which, inciden-

tally, spoils an otherwise enjoyable performance from playwright Harold Pinter, a commanding presence, a fine speaker, an understated actor.) The novel, in common with other Austens, is in essence a fairy tale, in specific a Cinderella story, and there can be no place in it for *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. The same could be said for the gross carnality with which the marital indiscretion of Mrs. Rushworth is depicted, when Fanny barges through a bedroom door and finds herself, as it were, momentarily in an illustrated edition of *Tom Jones*. The delicate balance of Austen's make-believe universe again gets hit with a sandbag. One wonders

why Rozema thought she wanted to take on Austen in the first place. To *improve* her? To *educate* her? To *convert* her? Frances O'Connor, Jonny Lee Miller, Alessandro Nivola, Embeth Davidtz. 1999.



The film starts right out throwing haymakers first-thing-in-the-morning vomit, whambam-thank-you-ma'am sodomy, good-oleboy bigotry, Death Row, the Last Walk, more vomit, a suicide, and a hit-and-run fatality - before it settles down to a hesitant, awkward, muted interracial romance (with Halle Berry, a Death Row widow), and more vomit. The Mothman Prophecies — Sort of an elaborated segment of "The Unexplained" on TV's Unsolved Mysteries, minus Robert Stack and his trenchcoat. Purportedly based on a factual case circa 1967 (here updated), it details some strange doings in anticipation of a major calamity in the small town of Point Pleasant, W. Va. No more should be revealed of those doings other than to say they point to a grand design, however far beyond our comprehension, in the seemingly random tragedies that visit humanity. The design, to the degree that it can be glimpsed, gives a design to the movie as well, and gives to it a corresponding degree of elegance. The degree of factuality, meantime, scarcely matters except insofar as it encourages the filmmakers to keep a lid on, and to let the tension build, till the big finish. The belief of director Mark Pellington in the paranormal rises nowhere near to the level of seriousness of, say, a Carl Dreyer. But his belief — his conviction — rises at least to that of a Terence Fisher or Freddie Francis in their Hammer Horror hevday. Quite sufficient, that is, for a work of imagination. (Of course the drawback to the factuality, or pretense thereof, is that the filmmakers' imagination cannot quite connect all the dots.) The acting tends to be a bit heavy, and the huge closeups make it seem even heavier: make it seem to belong more in a genre piece than in a journalistic or a propaganda one. But that's not altogether a bad thing. The cast of characters features a quorum of requisite figures: a rationalist reporter for the *Washington Post* (Richard Gere), a ploddingly ordinary and overmatched cop (Laura Linney), a God-fearing unimpeachable witness (Will Patton), a winged anthropomorphous creature that fits no known prototype, and an in-theknow occultist (Alan Bates) who can give a name to the thing: Mothman, as translated from the tongue of the Ukraine. When asked the common question of why, if this creature knows so much more than us mere mortals, it doesn't simply come out and share its secrets, the occultist has a good answer: "You're more advanced than a cock-

roach. Have you ever tried explaining yourself to one of them?" 2002.

Mulholland Drive — David Lynch's The Straight Story, we are hereby reassured, was the aberration; the twisted story is the one for him. In this case it's a braided story, besides twisted, of the intertwined fates of two women, one light and one dark, a starryeved, starry-sweatered Hollywood hopeful from Deep River, Ontario, and a haunted, hunted amnesiac from who knows where. The filmmaker's freedom from normal plot logic, to put it in the most neutral light, frees him to do pretty much whatever he wants. (Or, in a more jaundiced light, frees him to be the poster boy for self-indulgence.) In the result, the entertainment value is fitfully higher than in the average plodder chained to conventionality. For examples: the abstract swing-dance competition of the opening and the later lip-sync auditions to Girl Rock goldie-oldies; the well-wishing elderly couple at LAX whose mile-wide grins stretch all the way to rictus: the spectator-sport lesbianism tailored for the heterosexual male (the hilly landscape: little-known Naomi Watts, a wholesome Penelope Ann Miller type, and Laura Harring, a former Miss USA, formerly spelled



Herring but never mistaken for a fish); the unpredictable casting of supporting parts (ex-hoofer Ann Miller, Lee Grant in a fright wig, one-time pretty boy and now pretty old man Chad Everett); the stiff, ill-fitting costume and dialogue of a shady character known as The Cowboy: "Stop and think for a little second. Can you do that for me?" Such bits and pieces, though they don't add up to a whole, let you know you are watching something out of the ordinary. Other bits and pieces, though they let you know the same thing, arouse less enthusiasm about it. The trade-off for all that freedom from logic is that Lynch is freed, too, from viewer involvement. And when toward the end he makes a concerted effort, zigging and zagging, to leave the viewer behind (dislocated time, swapped roles), most viewers will be just as happy to let him go ahead, if only he'd hurry up about it. The film is a slow two and a half hours, much of it clunkily staged and — the most disheartening deviation from The Straight Story smearily photographed. 2001.

Annie Proulx novel about a widower named Quoyle who returns with his daughter Bunny to his Newfoundland roots, and becomes (among other things) the ace reporter on a local rag called The Gammy Bird. A tall tale, a dark tale, a droll tale, arch, sardonic, grotesque, gaudy, absurd, odd, occult, unnatural — loaded, in short, with the hallmarks of contemporary Serious Fiction. Kevin Spacey (acting like a half-wit), Cate Blanchett (acting like a cream tart), Judi Dench (acting crusty), and Julianne Moore (acting with an accent) invest it with some of the traits of Serious Cinema as well. A merry-go-round is conspicuous by its absence and would have provided a happy visual allusion to Carnival of Lost Souls, as well as a reminder of the meaningless cycle of the damned, chained to that wheel of life and death...but there is a Ferris wheel. It is sufficiently tall at its highest point to elicit "oohs" and "ahhs" and a vision of being stuck up there helpless, maybe after having been the sole witness to a grisly murder below and making blood-curdling eye contact with the murderous geek, red in tooth and claw. It is also tall enough to draw lightning, one would think, but, oops, sorry folks, no such luck, the lightning is likely to be snared by the metallic monkey-bar erections supporting the high-voltage power lines that weave over unsuspecting heads throughout the park.

Inside the arcade, if it's anything like last Friday, you'll find the youngsters, all right. Fugitives from those redundant Friday-afternoon school hours, you'll find funseekers from ages 13 to 30, anytime from 11 a.m. until midnight. Heck, they can spend the whole 11 hours at the joystick or on the Tilt-a-Whirl ride, putt a few holes and gobble sugary or salty, nutrition-free junk for a low, low \$10 all day (ask your courteous attendant for details), and many of them looked as if they had. Here's a young fellow, I thought to myself last Friday, who is playing hooky from junior high. The fellow is doing a spasmodic, jerky, and writhing boogaloo on the tiny electronic dance floor of the Japanese disco game. Sweating, determined, it is hard to tell if this young hoofer is having the time of his life learning this sadistic, arrhythmic dance routine or is actually being fatally electrocuted as onlookers cheer.

Walking past the livery stable, the sheriff's office and assay office, over a putting green, and between a high-voltage tower and Mother Hubbard's show, I turn my collar to the wind and shake my head wistfully. My imagination isn't done with the young man on the dance-game machine and his younger friend. Both of their mouths had been thoroughly smeared by artificial cherry or strawberry coloring and both stretched open in an O of surprise by 25-cent jawbreakers from a gigantic plastic sphere at the entrance. On the lam from school, maybe hiding out from a dysfunctional family until Dad passes out and Mom comes home from the casino, this young John Travolta is pursuing his dream of fleet-footed transcendence on the dance floor and is willing to show his younger protégé a few moves. After all, there's no snotty, big-breasted cheerleaders to laugh at them on the dance floor here, no partners to lead or drag, smirk or reject; they are all alone a dance-bliss machine of one moving part in a Sufi-dervish



swirl. Odd though, the persistent illusion of electrocution or seizure, a more desperate and palsied Eddie Vedder, or an epileptic electronic hockey player on amphetamines.

A young family from India or Pakistan, judging by their caste marks, walked somberly past me in that twilight gloom before the evening lights came on at Family Fun Center. Each carried a putter like a torch through the gloom, each silent, unsmiling. Across the way, a fire-truck ride of some kind sits abandoned in the shadows, its darkened windows like missing teeth in a rictus smile. The truck is on a track that leads only inches in front of it and behind it. How far can it go? What can it do? What kind of ride can this possibly be? An abandoned fire truck frozen or mired in time. This will no doubt give rise to a suitable metaphor later but at the moment it is hopeless. Maybe that's it. Hopelessness.

The wind is skirling candy wrappers, ice cream bar sticks, and cigarette butts. Another mother herds her children away from the camera held by the man with the discomfiting smile that is me. From the other end of the park a small child screams, probably in delight or simple high spirits, but I allow myself the mental image of the pirate-boat ride rocking back and forth like a pendulum. At the western apogee of its lift, the family dog, maybe a chow or poodle, is flung into the night, yelping, only to be swallowed by the rush-hour freeway traffic heading north, the child a horrified witness to death's random pluckings.

But the lights will be on at any moment now, and that window of the best and darkest fun will be over. Come and see for yourselves, one Friday night this winter, maybe in the rain, but it must be experienced in that tremor of twilight and pitch before the lights...just before the lights.

I'm scared. What was once a fat pink swaddling of flesh around the base of my bottom teeth has begun to recede and wear thin. The roots of my teeth are beginning to show, looking like long, skeletal fingers reaching down into my jaw. The gums, once firm, are mushy. I am young — only in my early 30s — and I am afraid of the dentist's chair, so I decided to bolster my regimen of oral hygiene in the hopes of staving off the onset of gum disease. Up until now, I had limped along with oncea-day brushing and sporadic use of mouthwash. I decided to double the brushing, make the mouthwash a daily experience, and start flossing.

Memories of childhood visits to the dentist came back to me, the ideal of "Brush and floss after every meal!" being repeated like a mantra by oral hygienists. But while the mantra remained, I had forgotten the tech-

nique, so I called Linda Hughes, owner and operator of Excelle Medical and Dental College. She had once given me advice on proper brushing techniques, and now even Patrick brushes up and down (mostly) instead of sideways. She welcomed my inquiries into the next level of dental care.

"Flossing removes food and bacteria, which cause cavities between the teeth. The bristles of a toothbrush can't reach that area — they're not strong enough to separate the teeth and clean between them. Ideally, flossing should be done after each meal, but if that's not possible, at least once a day.' If you don't floss, "normally what happens is that an individual will develop cavities between the teeth and gum disease."

The Why concluded, she moved on to the

How: "The floss thread itself should be about 12 to 18 inches long. It should be wrapped around the fingers [to create a taut length of floss]. Then you use a kind of see-saw motion down in between the contact points of the two teeth - gently, so you don't snap the gum, because that causes bleeding. Now, once the floss is down in between

the teeth, it is wrapped around the sides of the tooth." Then comes the actual flossing. "It's a back-and-forth motion, as if you were polishing a pair of shoes.

'What we find with most people is that they're religious about flossing and brushing, but they haven't been doing it correctly. Instead of doing the buffing motion, they just go up and down, so they're not

actually cleaning. They still have particles caught between their teeth. What they end up doing is actually tucking the particles into the soft tissue.'

616 All that remained for me was to pick a type — I seemed to recall waxed and unwaxed — and get started. But which one? "Waxed floss is waxed to give more ease [as it moves] down between the teeth. It's for people who have what are called tight contact points. Then there is unwaxed." Because it lacks a wax coating, "the unwaxed will thread itself down and splay out; instead of remaining just one thread, it becomes several. It cleans a broader area." The waxed, which doesn't splay, "is still very effective; you just have to use a little up and down motion in conjunction with the back and forth."

But the floss world is not divided simply into the waxed and the unwaxed. "Dental tape is a much broader floss; most all dental tapes are waxed. I like dental tape because it cleans a broader area." Flossers — preflossed, Yshaped sticks (Dr. Du-More, \$1.34 for 30; Johnson & Johnson, \$2.26 for 20; both at Wal-Mart) — "are especially good for individuals who have a challenge with finger or hand dexterity, either physically or mentally. Multifilament flosses make a difference for individuals who have had previous problems they've got wider spaces between their teeth due to gum disease; or, for the individual who

is very, very conscious and really wants to get in there and prevent anything from occurring. A person can try a couple of different types and find what works for them."

I hung up the phone and started zooming from drug store to drug store, gathering the tiny white floss boxes. In order to help me adhere to my new regimen, my husband Patrick agreed to join in the flossing. We sifted through the pile of dispensers, looking for unwaxed vari-

-"the straight stuff," Patrick called it. My first attempt resulted in a bloody mess; the floss shone bright red as it left my mouth. I was not for the unwaxed; Patrick took them on. The Johnson & Johnson smooth, flat band (\$.97 for 55 yards at Wal-Mart) slipped between his front teeth. "I feel this liberation between my teeth," he marveled. "There's no question that your teeth feel better when you do this." The Sav-On and Long's flosses (\$.99 for 100 yards and \$1.99 for 100 yards, respectively) proved less marvelous. The former appeared striated, while the latter twisted like a miniature jump rope; neither seemed to spread as wide or clean as well as Johnson & Johnson's.

I took on the standard waxed varieties. The drugstore brands — Rite Aid (\$1.99 for 100 yards), Sav-On (\$.99 for 100 yards), and Long's (\$1.99 for 100 yards) - proved indistinguishable. All three slipped through my teeth more easily than the waxed floss from Johnson & Johnson (\$.97 for 55 yards at Wal-Mart). But again, the Johnson & Johnson seemed to do the best job of spreading wide and cleaning. My top pick of the group, Oral B's Mint Waxed Floss (\$.97 for 55 yards at Wal-Mart) eased between my teeth like satin, and the powerful mint scent covered the rancid smell of the liberated decaying food particles.

Next, we tried the premium flosses, which tended to cost two or three times as much as the standards and provided half to a quarter of the floss. We both delighted in the Glide (\$3.24 for 54.7 yards at Wal-Mart). Patrick gushed, "It has a very sexy viewing window, so you know when you're running out." There were no visible fibers in the wide band, and it stuck to the fingers better than the average waxed floss. And it cleaned like a dream. Two of the store-brand versions, Sav-On High Tech Floss (\$2.99 for 54.7 yards) and Rite Aid Premium

Waxed (\$2.79 for 54.7 yards), were fibrous, not as wide,

> and didn't clean as well. On the plus side, they did have the Glide's tendency to stick to fingers, making them easy to manipulate. Long's High Tech Floss (\$2.89 for 54.7 yards), however, came closest to the Glide

in terms of feel, shape, and performance.

Patrick pressed on, snapping open the Oral B Ultra Floss (\$2.47 for 27 yards at Wal-Mart). "What is this, some kind of uberfloss? It seems to be a spongy fiber that stretches thin like a bungee cord to slip between the contact points. Then it's supposed to spring back to its original thickness to clean. But the force of pulling it when you clean the teeth makes it go thin again. Maybe it's my technique, but it doesn't seem to work."

Last, he tried the Glide Dental Tape (\$3.24 for 24.7 yards at Wal-Mart). This is a good 75 percent wider than the average floss. I don't like it as well as the Glide floss. The wideness of it makes it harder for me to control. This is the first one that I've actually scratched my

Scrubbing and Sweeping and Washing, Oh My

Some women want diamonds. Some women want a week in Hawaii. I want a day to clean my house. A whole day. I can imagine how the day would go. I would wake up in the morning. The house would be quiet. I would take a shower, get dressed, and go downstairs. After I toasted a fresh onion bagel and brewed a cup of Starbucks' house blend, I would read the paper. When I had straightened up the kitchen, I would go back upstairs.

I would strip the sheets off all the beds and put the first load in the washer. Then I would move through each of the three bedrooms, straightening, dusting, putting toys away. I would sort through the drawers and closets and pack away the clothes my five children have outgrown. I would scrub the bathrooms and set out fresh towels. Finally, I would vacuum, using all the attachments to get cobwebs off the drapes and dust off the lampshades and out of the corners of the rooms.

When I'd finished upstairs, I would repeat the whole process downstairs. I would get down on my hands and knees and scrub the grout between the kitchen floor tiles. I would rearrange the books in the bookshelves and clean the crumbs that have accumulated in the breadbox. No one would interrupt me asking for juice or to go to the bathroom or to play at the park. When the whole house shone and smelled of pine cleaner and lemon Pledge, I would sit and sip another cup of coffee and read a book.

I thought about my perfect cleaning day last night at 11:30 as I wiped the last streak of Windex off the downstairs bathroom mirror. I had to clean house because I had scheduled a play date for my five-year-old daughter Lucy. Lucy goes to preschool. One of Lucy's classmates, Victor, has a crush on her. Victor always sits next to Lucy during circle time and chases other boys away when they play on the playground. Victor's dad invited us over last week for lunch and a play date.

When we walked into Victor's house, my mouth dropped open. In a newer development near our home in San Marcos, Victor's house looked like a model home. Victor's dad, who decorated the home, pointed out the different colors he'd used in each room. He showed me some of the antiques he'd found around North County. Beautifully framed photographs and paintings lined the walls. "This is just gorgeous," I told him.

"And it's A LOT bigger than our house," Lucy pointed out.

"Yeah," Lucy's younger brother Johnny chimed in. "A LOT bigger."

I am not generally embarrassed about my home. My husband Jack and I and our kids live in an 1800-square-foot house at the end of a cul-de-sac. The cul-de-sac overlooks a treeshaded park where we often take the kids to play. The house is 25 years old. The previous owner remodeled the house and put in a new kitchen. The house suits us. We have simple furniture and not a lot of tchotchkes. Jack and I both like clean lines, lighter colors, and the less clutter the better. We keep the kids' toys in bins and baskets in the family room and our home office.

"It's not that small," I told Victor's dad. 'We'll have you guys over next week."

As the day for Lucy's play date drew nearer, I grew more anxious. "Look at the spots on the carpet," I moaned to Jack one evening. "I've got to clean the house before Victor and his dad come over. But when?'

Iack knows I have a hard time cleaning house during the day.
