

Whitewashed history When University of California president and San Diego



favorite son **Richard C. Atkinson** announced his planned retirement last week at the age of 73, saying he was returning to La Jolla, his hometown *Union-Tribune* provided a glowing history of his career, lavishing special at-


tention on the role the paper said Atkinson had in promoting lo-

cal commerce. But the *U*-*T* conspicuously omitted one of the biggest headlines from Atkinson's five-year tenure as UCSD chancellor during the '80s: an ex-Harvard professor's allegation that Atkinson got her pregnant and then pressured her into an abortion. The story began in September 1982 when education professor **Lee H. Perry** filed a \$1 million lawsuit charging that — after she became pregnant in 1977 during an affair

that had begun in Paris in 1976 - Atkinson promised to father another child within a year if she would follow his wishes and abort her pregnancy. As the tempest grew, Atkinson and his wife **Rita** held a press conference in which Atkinson acknowledged knowing the 36-yearold Perry but denied having an affair with her. He claimed he had been "grievously wronged" and implied Perry was a gold digger. "The allegations are false and are so far-fetched that it is hard to believe they can be the basis of a lawsuit," Atkinson said. But Perry's attorney, Marvin Mitchelson, famous for his pioneering paternity case against actor Lee Marvin, said financial remuneration was not this client's main objective. "The money is not near as important to her as the child. She'd gladly trade one for the other," Mitchelson said. "This baby was very important to her, considering her age and time of life. She'd bargain for that. She'd drop her suit if he'd artificially inseminate her." The lawyer also claimed he had documentation proving that Atkinson had accompanied Perry to a Boston abortion clinic. Perry later showed up in front of her Harvard psychology class vowing to soldier on despite the publicity. "I'm not going to change my name and go to Hawaii. I look forward to teaching this course." The case was finally settled in 1986, when Atkinson, still denying the charges, agreed to pay Perry \$225,000. But it continued to haunt Atkinson nine years later when abortion opponents questioned his fitness to become president of the university system. "I have never in my life at any time advised anyone to seek an abortion," declared Atkinson, the choice of then-governor Pete Wilson. "That is really all I have to say about the matter."

SONGS-1 of the South The power plant at San Onofre has one less contaminated

nuclear reactor to worry about, but the folks in Charleston, South Carolina, aren't exactly celebrating. Last month San Onofre operator Southern California Edison removed the decommissioned reactor, known as SONGS-1, and put it on a barge destined for the East Coast. It turns out that California's radioactive loss is South Carolina's dubious gain, and some of the local citizenry are upset by the prospect of the 700-ton reactor package being shipped through the port of Charleston and dumped forever into a "low level" nuclear waste site in Barnwell. "These reactors are very hot components. Ultimately, they are a big waste problem. This is a trend, and it's really going to be a curse to South Carolina,"

"The reactor does contain radioactive material. I don't want to dismiss that." But for anybody who happened to be near the used reactor, "The dose would be very low."


A block off the old chip When Las Vegas securities lawyer Max Tanner was sentenced last week to eight years in federal prison for masterminding a multimillion-dollar scheme of tax evasion and stock fraud, his son was present to provide moral support. "I wish I had not made the poor decisions I made," Tanner the elder told the court, according to an account in the Las Vegas Review-Journal. An excommunicated Mormon, Tanner operated telephone boiler rooms to sell stock in Maid Aide, a phony outfit that bilked thousands out of their life savings. 

Fatal Shore

hen two robbers with handguns ordered him to lie face down next to his pickup in Mission Beach, Paul Cullen refused.

"I figured if they were going to shoot me," he says about the holdup last summer, on August 23, at 11:15 p.m. in a carport off the alley behind his apartment, "I wanted to see them before they did it." And he feared they would be more likely to shoot him in the back than they would if he faced them. After they pulled his wallet from his pants pocket, one assailant, who had stepped out of the carport to keep watch down the alley, kept shouting to the other, "Just shoot him." But Cullen was able to slide along his truck to gain more distance and a better angle from his attacker in the darkness. Before the assailants ran away, however, he had already looked them in the eyes

Two SDPD officers came in 15 minutes to take a report, which included the victim's description of the size and clothing of two young black men. But Cullen was disappointed that, as far as he knew, the police ever did any further investigation of the crime scene. "They could have easily gotten fingerprints," he says, "because all the attackers' marks were on the side of the truck, on the door, and on the mirror." Cullen said the officers did not seem interested in looking for the men, who had es-

caped separately onto Mission Bay Boulevard and Bayside Walk. "I told them," Cullen continues, "that they had people on the boardwalk right now with loaded guns. They didn't go search for them. They drove down the alley to the stop sign, took a left, and that's the last I saw of them."

Although a detective was assigned to his case, Cullen became frustrated that he could get little additional response from the police. After an initial conversation, the detective did not return phone calls he placed to her until she called to say he would be summoned to view a police lineup. But he heard nothing further about that. Finally, six weeks after his robbery, he learned that the detective would be retiring and that a new detective would take her place. That was two months after his robbery.

The phone call about a possible lineup intrigued Cullen, because it came only days after police arrested Darius Days and Calvin Pearce, both 18, on suspicion of murdering SDSU student Paul Mefford on El Carmel Point in Mission Bay earlier in the summer. At the time of his killing, Mefford had been trying to retrieve his bicycle from the bed of a de-





parting pickup. The murder occurred not more than 200 yards from the site of Cullen's robbery and a little more than five weeks before it.

Two days before the robbery, on August 21, a Beach and Bay Press headline announced that police had reassured the Mission Bay Council "of safety at the beach." The department had assigned one additional fiveofficer "beach team" to patrol the area in the face of nervousness over the Mefford murder and other incidents. In the aftermath of his robbery, says Cullen, police told him that recent crimes were isolated incidents. He also heard from city councilmember Byron Wear's

communications director, Peter Bryan, that "There is no gang activity at the beach." But at 8:30 p.m. on the

Friday after police arrested Days and Pearce, employees of the Mission Bay Yacht Club, at the tip of El Carmel Point, called police about several individuals tagging the walls of brick restrooms nearby. "This was the worst graffiti that I can recall, ever," says Buz Rahe, a resident of the area who organized a neighborhood letter, with 30 signatures on it, to Councilmember Wear.

Peter Bryan also told Cullen that incidents like his robbery are "just a part of living at the beach." But residents in the area of El Carmel Point don't buy it. "There's an attitude," observes Cindy Francisco, who lives on Bayside Walk, "that La Jolla? I don't think so." But Francisco is pessimistic; she believes that the SDPD is so understaffed that it can't keep up with the Mission Beach residents' many complaints of loud and rowdy behavior, especially late at night in the summer. After Mefford's murder on July 14, "We took five officers from Southeast San Diego," says Francisco. "I felt bad about that." (She has heard in casual conversations with members of the police that officers routinely resign from the department to seek better pay in other cities.) It also bothers her that the shortage of officers forces police to assign low priority to violations of noise-disturbance laws

continued from page 8 tim, but they didn't go looking for the perpetrator.

Donald DeBlasio, another neighborhood resident, reflects on Mission Beach being a narrow peninsula between the ocean and the bay that has only one southern and one northern escape. "My guess is that the criminals are not swimming out

of here," he says. The problem, according to DeBlasio, is less one of manpower shortage than it is of management. "There isn't a police presence in the beach area," he says. "A cop is referred to as a flatfoot. We don't have those here in San Diego. It's rare to see a single policeman, or maybe two, out walking a beat. They're usually wrapped in their cars with their computers and guns, and they're ganged together.

"If you look at the series of things that led up to the murder this summer, there were guys out there with a bonfire — it's not like they were hiding — and there were noise complaints, people screaming and yelling, and kegs. It's easy to play 'what if,' but what if the area was patrolled, and they didn't have the message over the years that it's not only okay to drink here — hell, we're going to plant a keg? I think you can understand why the other guys who were carrying guns had no fear, either, to hang out there and steal the bicycles and say, 'Hey, we can get out of here, too.' "

In New York City, where DeBlasio is from, "They put cops out walking a beat to let the criminals know that around any corner, at any time, a policeman could be popping up. I don't see that at all here in San Diego. They always say we need more police, but if we had more police we'd have more police in cars driving around or sitting at 7-Eleven. They don't patrol, they don't walk a beat. They gather together and wait for something to happen. Then they're dispatched and five cars show up. We can have more police, but the usage of the police is what I question.

"On Long Island, every once in a while, two cops would park and talk to each other. When that would happen, all the neighbors would call the dispatcher and complain that they weren't doing their job.

"I understand that being a flatfoot is the lowliest job that a New York policeman can have. It is not a fun job, yet it is a necessary job. Even as a kid growing up, they used to do that with the kids gathering in the park. They'd put the cops out on a beat, and they'd sneak up on us, and it made us think that, if we were out drinking our beer, a cop could be coming up. Just the thought that they could sneak up on you was enough, as opposed to a car driving up on you. No way is a police car going to sneak up on you."

According to DeBlasio,

the population density in Mission and Pacific Beach is similar to much of New York. But the SDPD "doesn't want to put the cops out there. They don't want them to walk beats. I had friends who were New York police, a crazy

job. Who would want to do it? You've got to be nuts. And you know what they told me? 'That's my job.' It is not for everybody, and they understand, when they put on their uniform and go out there, *continued on page 14*

they're putting a bulls-eye on themselves. But that's what they chose to do. If you're looking for the glory and to walk on the beach in your shorts with your friends, then maybe police work isn't what you should be doing."

Paul Cullen's robbery "shook us, because that could have been any one of us," says DeBlasio, "and the way that was handled, thecops seem to just want to fill out a report."

In the robbery, Cullen lost 4. A \$100 cash, four credit cards, his Social Security card, and his driver's license. The thieves immediately used the credit cards to buy gas, but the card companies, such as Citibank and American Express, quickly closed Cullen's accounts. His luck with the Department of Motor Vehicles has not been as good. He asked the agency for a new driver's license, with a new number, to help protect against his identity being stolen. "They said my request

had been denied," says Cullen, "but they couldn't give me a reason why." He had honored the DMV's request to mail to Sacramento the police report and an affidavit from Citibank that the thieves had tried to use his license. "But they said my materials were sent to microfilm. Now, I've gotten a voice-mail message that they can't find my documents. So I'm going to have to start over."










STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP



You know, MA,

Here's a pretty simple one that I just can't answer for myself. Just how far away is the horizon? Seems pretty simple, right? But all the science books give all the math about the height of the observer, square root, and all that good stuff. From my calculations, the horizon is only 1.5 miles away. But visibility is sometimes said to be, for example, 10 miles on a clear day. So if I lie on the sand at PB and I see a boat that looks like it is sitting on the edge of the world, how far away is it? I really, really want to know.

Of course we all know that if you're lying on the sand at PB, you can see only as far as the cooler of the person between you and the horizon. So that's three feet? Four feet? But if you insist.... Had to wake up the geometry elves. They don't get much of a workout, so they're not usually sitting around with pencils sharpened, ready to be called into the game. Once they'd had their coffee, they took a vote on whether they should even bother helping someone who has so little respect for square roots.

If you're lying on the PB sand, let's say your eyes are maybe three inches above sea level. That's not really true, but let's say it is. The elves calculate your personal horizon at 0.67 (statute) miles away. Raise your head up to see over that cooler, so your eyes are about a foot above sea level, the horizon is now about 1.34 miles away. Stand on the cooler, six feet above sea level, 3.3 miles. You'd have to be about 60 feet above sea level to spot a duck 10 miles away.

We'd give you a handy formula to figure this out for yourself, Langston, but clearly you've got a thing about math. But for anybody else, the distance to the horizon is about 1.17 times the square root of your eye height (in feet) above sea level. Basically, what we're doing is calculating the length hypotenuse of a right triangle.

And I know already that I'll get letters from the pickers of nits. What we've given here is the geometric distance to a point on the horizon. Because of light refraction, we're able to see any object (e.g., a boat) that is slightly beyond the horizon. And the top of a ship's mast will come into view when it is farther away than the geometric horizon. There's a formula for that too, but the geometry elves are bored and have gone back to sleep.

way to meet "normal," well-educated professionals.

Ms. McGinty launched the company with the simple premise: a dating service based on a personalized screening and a painless meeting with her to determine whether she had the type of people the client would like to meet.

Lisa Purdum loves matching her clients. "The typical person I meet every day is not just a busy and successful individual, but they have also done extraordinary things with their lives. My job never

even feels like a job; it feels like fun and I am making people happy and that's why I'm doing it."

Diane Heil is very proud of her successes. "Many of my matches have resulted in second dates," she says. "But my biggest high is when they call and tell me that they would have never met otherwise."

And, It's Just Lunch caught on quickly! The company currently has 40 offices with over 20,000 clients with plans for international expansion this year.

Maria Bailey enjoys matching her clients. "People call me and say they are picky," she says. "And, that's exactly why I'm here: to be picky for them."

The dating service caters to an upscale audience, Ms. Purdum explained. Nearly 100% have college degrees, 75% have a graduate degree; many are lawyers, doctors, bankers and business executives. Men who join are in age from 26 to 55, most women from 24 to 45. In fact, one of It's Just Lunch's recent success stories occurred in a matter of 6 hours. Elizabeth, a 33-year-old advertising executive came in at 10 a.m. and joined the service. Tim, a 37-year-old doctor, signed up at 4 p.m. "I was so excited during the interview with Tim because I knew I had exactly what he was looking for....Elizabeth. They were both passionate about the outdoors; he had just come back from mountain climbing in Denver and she had just finished biking in Italy," says the director. Her gut was right on the mark! They have been dating for 7 months now.

The majority come to It's Just Lunch because they are tired of the bar scene, have not been meeting the right people or they don't want to date co-workers.

The professional approach appealed to John, a 43-year-old attorney. He saw an article about the company in Forbes magazine and liked the efficient, no-pressure approach. "I was meeting most people through work or acquaintances, but I wasn't happy with whom I was meeting because I didn't feel anyone

knew what I was looking for in a potential mate," John says. He decided to call It's Just Lunch because he liked the private and discreet process the com-

It wasn't until his fourth lunch date that John met Ann, a 32-year-old teacher. "Yes, I knew in the first 10 minutes. Our lunch date lasted nearly 3 hours and we've been dating exclusively for the past 5 months," claims John.

John still doesn't want most people to know how he met Ann, though he has discreetly mentioned the service to 2 colleagues.

And, what about the internet and dating? "Oh, it's been great for us," says Ms. McGinty. "A few of our clients have tried that and they come to us, have a few lunch dates and say WOW, we're so much more efficient and fun."

More than 70% of her clients are referred by another client, Nancy Kirsch observes. In general, a client calls the service for information. Then, a one-hour meeting is set up between the client and Director to discuss the type of person they'd like to meet. A wide array of topics are covered: age, education, background, hobbies, interests, people they have dated in the past and what their goals are.

If It's Just Lunch can offer good matches and the person decides to join, IJL accepts a \$1,500 check for a one-year membership (several smaller packages available). Within 48 hours, the company will call to tell the client all about their first date. The service handles all of the information in a confidential manner---while both people will know a lot about each other, last names and phone numbers are not given. It's up to the clients to do so after they have met---and most of them do exchange phone numbers and make plans to get together again. Then, they each check in with the company and give feedback on the date.

Ms. Heil and Ms. Bailey claim it is their good "gut" instinct and the personal attention that makes It's Just Lunch so different from other services. And, the evidence is tangible: wedding photos, a baby photo and thank you notes decorate their bulletin boards.

Ms. Purdum smiles and confesses to being a romantic at heart. "I believe there's absolutely somebody for everyone," she says.

Reverend Greg Wark says military service can be spiritually hazardous for soldiers.

"We ask a great deal of them. We send them out to offer up their lives for democracy. We ask them to do many things we'd rather not do or think about. We ask them to kill. They often bear guilt for the things we ask them to do. Often, this guilt makes them feel that they're not worthy of God or God's love."

Several years ago, a member of Reverend Greg Wark's congregation, a TV producer, asked him to go along on a visit to the Navy SEALs compound in Coronado.

"I came away so impressed by those men. By their courage. But they had such a great need for God. So many of them had broken marriages, broken families scattered all over the country. They drank heavily, partied hard, slept around a lot. So much of what they did was a consequence of what they'd been through, what'd they'd seen. I knew we had to find a way to share God with them.'

Reverend Wark created FORCE, a ministry directed at men serving in the Special Forces. Dozens of soldiers in the U.S. and abroad now meet weekly at FORCE Bible studies. These men will soon be able to access a password-controlled

FORCE website that will allow them to get spiritual counseling and attend virtual church services while aboard ship.

Several dozen young men serving in the Special Forces attend Reverend Wark's Morning Star Christian church, which meets at Torrey Pines Elementary School. Some are married; some are single. They dress in Tshirts and sandals. They slap backs, shake hands. Perhaps because so many of the church's members share a common experience, the congregation has a self-confident family feel that you don't often experience in other places of worship. A dozen people introduced themselves to me. They offered me bagels with cream cheese. They offered me muffins and coffee. They invited me to lunch after the service.

The congregation spent 40 minutes singing anthem-style soft-rock hymns. At first I thought it was my imagination when it seemed that the folks at Morning Star sang with greater conviction than you see expressed at most evangelical churches. But I realized that lyrics like "I will give my life to the Lord" and "I will surrender all my fear to God" held particular meaning for soldiers and military families.

God and war are intertwined. In the *Bhagavad Gita*, Arjuna and Krishna, his charioteer, are poised to enter an awesome battle when Krishna reveals himself as God. Battles waged by and against the Children of Israel fill the Hebrew Bible. The Koran, as we've all recently learned, regards war as a literal and metaphorical duty required of all true believers. Reverend Wark, when we spoke, told me to remember the many soldiers that appear in the New Testament, in particular the centurion in Matthew 8 who uttered the famous words, "Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof."

In his sermon, Reverend Wark reminded us of words spoken by another famous solider, Governor Jesse Ventura.

"When he said that religion was for weak people, many of us got angry. But even

in the most unpleasant criticism, there's often an element of truth. We should listen closely to what he said. We have to face the fact that Christianity, as it's often taught today, is for weak people. The Bible is filled with stories of men and women who gave their lives for their faith, but churches often preach an easy, user-friendly Christianity that asks nothing of its followers. Any soldier would notice this contradiction. And a soldier, Jesse Ventura, pointed it out. Why follow a religion that preaches courage and bravery, but fails to live out those same values?" Reverend Wark

Reverend Wark went on to tell us that true faith wasn't for the cowardly. He said that the phrase "give up" didn't appear in the Bible. He admonished us to emulate the Bible's great heroes like Joseph. "Joseph did not allow the tragedies in his life to define him.

"When you allow tragedy, the storm, inside, it infects every part of your soul and every part of the goodness in your life. When you allow the storm inside, suicide becomes an infatuation. When you feel hopeless, the storm's inside. You have to keep the storm outside and maintain a resolute spirit."

After the service, I asked Reverend Wark what he felt posed the greatest obstacle between soldiers and faith.

"It's not that religion is for sissies. It's the guilt. It oozes from them. Even if they don't say anything. Again, think of what we ask them to do. Think of the challenges and decisions they must face. They have to kill to defend our freedoms, even our freedom to vilify them after they return home, which happened for example after the Vietnam War. These Special Forces guys call themselves 'excellent operators.' And we require that of them. But their hearts are as vulnerable as our own."


Dear Cara,

Like you, I'm not crazy about the idea of guests bringing their own servings of food to dinner parties or of them toting personal beverage canteens to such festivities. If they've brought enough for everyone (e.g., a guest arrives with a case of fancy champagne under her arm), or they suffer from complicated health problems that prevent them from being able to eat or drink the fare provided, that's an exception. In the case of the latter circumstance, I would imagine that the considerate guest could discreetly let the hostess know ahead of time about their particular dietary difficulties if they are so extreme as to necessitate their bringing a dinner pail. Unlike you, however, I don't have a problem with folks who carry bottled water while shopping or on the tennis court or driving their sedan. Here are some things I learned while investigating your interesting question that caused me to applaud rather than deplore those dedicated hydrators. People with weak or compromised immune systems are often advised by their physicians not to quaff tap water because it can contain microorganisms that wouldn't bother most of us but could make them ill. Since healthy adults are advised to drink a minimum of eight eightounce glasses of water a day, many of us can't get near that level of liquid intake unless we have a water bottle at hand during our busy day. Loads of doctors advise patients to carry a water bottle throughout the day to insure proper hydration, lack of which can cause fatigue and poor health. My doctor is a committed water-bottle carrier. Experts sav that by the time you feel thirsty, you could already be on the way to mild dehydration. So I say, let's toast the bottle brigade.

Nobody could believe that Bridget put the needle in her arm. Bridget is my niece, my sister Kathy's oldest daughter. She came from a loving home. She had been educated about the ravages of drugs, the danger of AIDS, the prison of addiction. She did it anyway. I was visiting Kathy when she got the call from the police; she had recently found marijuana in Bridget's

room and we were talking about what to do next. When the police told her that Bridget had been arrested for possession of narcotics, Kathy looked like she'd been walloped with a frying pan.

emotional baggage later, Bridget is clean. Now she's been accepted into an art school here in San Diego, and Kathy has asked if she can stay with me. I believe Bridget is serious about staying off drugs, so I agreed on the condition that she takes weekly drug tests while under my roof. Bridget consented, and Kathy offered to pay for the tests. My job was

to find them.

My first visit was to Long's Drugs. There, I found an overthe-counter test called Dr. Brown's Home Drug Testing System (**\$48.99**). The system tested for marijuana, amphetamines, methamphetamines, phencyclidine (PCP), codeine, morphine, and heroin. Inside were two plastic urine collection tubes, a foam container, an

absorbent pad and pouch, instructions, a preprinted ID number, and a mailing pouch. You mail in your sample, and, one to three days after delivery, you call an 800 number for results and referrals (if necessary). But I realized \$50 a week would get pricey fast, so I decided to keep looking.

I called Drug Testing Network in Vista (1-800-989-1206) and spoke with Renee. "A lot of people don't want the embarrassment of going up to the register at their local drugstore with a drug-testing kit. What we do is more confidential; you can come to our corporate headquarters at 958 Postal Way in Vista, Suite A, or we can mail the drug test to you. Further,

with our kits, you get your results immediately. With the drugstore kits, they're not allowed to give you immediate results, for fear that Mommy or Daddy

will kill little Johnny. mule Screening It's kind of a cooling-off period when you send it in, and they give counseling numbers when they give the results.

It's kind of like a pregnancy test," explained Renee. "It's a urinalysis. The person voids in the cup, a stick is dipped in the urine, you wait a couple of minutes, and boom, it'll give a positive or negative. A little red line will pop up if it's positive. A single kit (\$11.45) will test for one specific drug." The company also offers multipanel kits that test for marijuana, opiates, amphetamines, and PCP. "Those are \$24.95 if they take them home; if Mommy brings Johnny in here and "Marijuana is very easy to

detect because it stays in the

system a long time."

wants us to do it, it's \$34.95."

Back in the drugstores, I found two brands that offered immediate "screening' results. Rite Aid carried the First Check Home Drug Test kit, which ran **\$9.99** for marijuana; \$15.99 for marijuana and cocaine; and \$24.99 for marijuana, cocaine, opiates, and methamphetamines. The store also carried the At Home brand test, which ran \$14.99 for marijuana and **\$29.99** for a multipanel kit that

covered marijuana, amphetamines, methamphetamines, ecstasy, cocaine, and opiates. All the tests gave preliminary screening results in eight to ten minutes, but they noted that positive results were inconclusive and needed to be sent to a lab for confirmation. (Lab testing is included in the price of the test.)

Michelle at Accurate Biomedical Lab (619-237-3784) told me a few things about her company's mail-order urinalysis home drug-testing kits and about kits in general. "Urine kits test for what's there right now. The accuracy level with urine depends more on the drug that you're testing for than on the device. Marijuana [THC] is

very easy to detect, because it sticks around a long time. If you use it every day, it can stay in the urine and the fat cells for three months. Detection is 100 percent. Drugs like cocaine and amphetamines only stay in the system for a couple of days; accuracy levels are more like 97 percent.

"Our home test kit is just

as accurate as a lab test, but when you have a lab test, they do it twice. They use normal drug-cutoff levels, then they cut the levels in half and test again to confirm results. Our kit doesn't double check." Kits run **\$10** for marijuana; **\$10** for marijuana and cocaine (thanks to a sale that runs through January); \$26 for a five-panel test that covers marijuana, cocaine, PCP, opiates, and methamphetamines; and **\$36** for the big one, which 'covers all basic narcotics along with downers, Valium, and methadone." Discounts are given for volume orders.

I knew about Bridget's past; what I was concerned about was her present. I also trusted her to play by the rules. But sometimes testers want to look for drugs that may have been

flushed out of the system. Other times, they may suspect that urine samples have been diluted (one kit recommends putting food coloring in toilet water and shutting off water lines to the bathroom where the subject is voiding). For those cases, Accurate Biomedical offers a hair test (\$185).

"Every half-inch of hair goes back a month. You can't mask it, because the scientists don't test the outside of the hair. They actually grind it down and test the molecules. You can test back years if the hair is long.

"With the hair test, we normally send people to clinics [the company has locations throughout the U.S.]. However, in some cases, if the person seems with it enough to follow the technical instructions and fill out the lab and control forms correctly, then we may let them cut the specimen. We give them picture instructions and talk them through it over the phone. But if they do it incorrectly, or grab some hair from a hairbrush, they don't get their money back."



hat in the world is it? Some say it looks like an oversized version of the monolith in Stanley Kubrick's 2001: A Space Odyssey. Some liken it to a modernist mausoleum. It's been created by one of the trendiest New York architects in the realm of highpriced gallery design, whose work includes the Georgia O'Keeffe museum in Santa Fe and the Andy Warhol museum in Pittsburgh. It's stirring plenty of controversy among those who argue that it would deface the historic façade of downtown's Santa Fe Depot. And, though it's being largely paid for by Qualcomm magnate Irwin Jacobs, some critics are already calling it "The Bersin," in honor of what they say is the high-handed way it is being imposed on the city by Union-Tribune publisher David Copley and

Bersin's wealthy mother-in-law, Rancho Santa Fe's Pauline Foster.

The center of the controversy is the proposed downtown satellite headquarters of the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego, which, despite its name, is a firmly rooted La Jolla institution and a darling of the North County jet set. Two weeks ago, the museum held a dinner at the sprawling La Jolla residential compound of *U*-*T* publisher Copley, a longtime museum patron and board member, in honor of Christo, the Bulgarian landscape-wrapping installation artist who is a Copley favorite, and Christo's wife Jeanne-Claude. Copley owns one of the world's largest collections of Christo memorabilia and has put big money into some of the artist's most famous projects, including the 1991 installation of 1370 huge umbrellas in Japan and the Tejon Pass north of Los Angeles. The 67-year-old artist has also wrapped the Reichstag in Berlin. As reported by *U-T* society writer Burl Stiff, the Copley party, heralding the opening of a Christo exhibit at the museum's Prospect Street headquarters gallery, featured such museum stalwarts and Copley chums as Copley Press attorney Karl ZoBell; Mavourneen O'Connor, twin sister of former San Diego mayor Maureen O'Connor; and former TV reporter Susan Farrell. Museum director Hugh Davies was there, along with Bersin in-law Foster, the museum's president and widow of Stanley Foster, a

well-connected real estate developer and local financier. Wrote Stiff: "Copley is a major collector of Christo drawings and the principal underwriter of an exhibition — 'Christo and Jeanne-Claude in the Vogel Collection' and 'Christo in the David C. Copley Collection.

Added the columnist: "Dinner began with corn chowder and

miniature tamales, followed by a grilled filet of beef in puff pastry, and a salad of young greens with toasted goat cheese and walnuts. The dessert was old-fashioned carrot cake with a maplecream cheese frosting and pineapple ice cream. In informal remarks about the new exhibition, Hugh Davies called attention to a 1963

Christo portrait of Jeanne-Claude, wrapped. David Copley owns it, and has promised it to the museum."

Admirers of the Santa Fe Depot, though, are less concerned about Copley's menu and his fascination with Christo wraps than what they say is the U-T's onesided coverage of the modern art museum's plans to tear out a large

chunk of the 1915 vintage station on Kettner Boulevard and replace it with a three-story futuristic metal cube.

Devoting no coverage to critics of the project, except letters to the editor, the paper has repeatedly rolled out its big guns on behalf of the museum, including columnist Neil Morgan, who in January wrote, "A coming San Diego

tourism lure: the Museum of Contemporary Art's plans for its downtown expansion in the old Santa Fe Depot baggage rooms. This can be the kind of showplace that other cities have made from fading depots."


The same month, *U-T* art critic Robert Pincus wrote, "My wish: that the baggage building of the Santa Fe De-

pot will become a space for art on a consistent basis.... The museum has already enlisted two architects - one local (Wayne Donaldson), one New York-based (Richard Gluckman) who have a sound record for renovating historic buildings. Could there be a happier fate for this stately structure?"

The month before, the newspaper's architectural critic, Ann Jarmusch, offered what some considered to be a conspicuously tortured rationale for the plans to tack a modernistic cube onto the historic depot. "This proposed reuse of a significant historic structure is a thrilling prospect and a natural fit," she wrote. "To be built of corrugated









metal painted the dull red of freight cars and pierced by ribbed-glass or translucent windows, this proposed new building would not visually compete or clash with the historic baggage building or depot.

"Instead, the new building would echo, but never mimic, design elements, proportions and the rhythm of solid and void that flickers across the east and west façades of the depot, baggage building, and the nearest building to the north, the historic McClintock storage building, which houses Rainwater's restaurant."

In September, a story under the byline of art critic Pincus revealed that the depot project would be financed by a \$5 million donation from Qualcomm founder Irwin Jacobs and his wife Joan along with \$4.75 million more from a group of donors including Pauline Foster. "We've traveled with Hugh [Davies] and seen how similar spaces have led to great creativity by artists," Joan Jacobs was quoted as saying. Two weeks ago, continuing the drumbeat, the U-T ran an op-ed interview with museum director Davies, who easily fielded a series of softball questions about the project's aesthetics, posed by the paper's editorial board.

Yet despite the *U*-*T*'s united front, critics of the project have begun to multiply. First among them is downtown antique dealer Barbara Winton, who is leading a campaign, thus far unsuccessful, to block the deal. She is harshly critical of the roster of wealthy La Jollans behind the proposal and the way in which they have lobbied it through city hall.

"I would say that they have lots more



money than knowledge. Just because you can make a lot of money or you inherit it or your husband has made it and you have it doesn't make you knowledgeable," says Winton. "This is an ugly, plain, very modern building that would go next to one of our city's finest historical treasures. I think it's an abortion. As I always say, an elephant in the wrong place is not particularly pretty. It's out of place, it's ugly, and it should be built somewhere else."

Winton is also sharply critical of the New York architect recruited by museum director Davies to design the project and thinks the choice is tinged with more than a touch of Barbara Winton

for recruiting noted Philadelphia architect Robert Venturi in 1996 to overhaul the museum's La Jolla headquarters, originally designed as a residence by Irving Gill, the region's most famous homegrown architect. The Venturi remodel, hailed by some, drew brickbats from many others, including a reviewer from Art in America, who noted in July 1997 that "Venturi's postmodern playfulness here goes awry in the bombastic and overbearing entry court. Huge Dalmatian spots pattern the terrazzo floor, and an irregular star-shaped clerestory above dangles a wavy, perforated, patterned fin - its edges outlined in neon from each of its seven ribs."

Winton says that's a foreboding precedent. "My opinion is Gluckman got a nice vacation in Southern Cali-



fornia to come defend his building, and if it gets built we will have 20 to 30 years of horror to have to look at. It'll probably take at least that long for us to get it torn down. Once something is up, it's very difficult to get it removed."

Winton was present at an October 16 hearing on the project held by the city's redevelopment arm, the Centre City Development Corporation, which reviewed the plan and gave it a hasty thumbsup prior to sending it on to the city council, which is now set to hear the item November 26. If the plan is approved by the council, the site would be donated to the city by the depot's owner, real estate giant Catellus, Inc.; the city



would then lease the property to the museum until 2091. Winton says the CCDC board made it clear it was on the side of the development and refused to give opponents a fair hearing.

week," according to Winton, who says she looked on in chagrin as CCDC board members openly alluded to social and personal relationships they had with museum backers. "You could hear the cash registers jingle. I don't think that it's covert. It's quite overt. They get invited to places, they go to dinners. They are invited to museum welcoming parties. The social scene. This is very important

to some people." One board member, attorney Victor Vilaplana, declared he would recuse himself from voting on the issue, then went on to tell his colleagues about the project's great merits.



"Mr. Chair, because of my prior and current relationship with the museum and the museum's counsel, I am going to disqualify myself from the vote for the project, which I do think is a terrific and wonderful cultural and architectural addition to San Diego."

When museum president Pauline Foster went to the podium, she received a warm reception from the board. "[Foster] got up to speak and said, 'It's so nice to see you all again,'" Winton recalls, "and they all beamed back at her. When she said, 'It's so nice to see you again,' it wasn't very businesslike."

Yet even as they fell into line for a six-tonothing vote in favor of the building, several members of the CCDC board winced with displeasure over its design. "I support the project, but I have to be a little bit honest. When I look at the building, perhaps I don't have the architectural eye," said member Gil Johnson. "I support this, but I really do have some heartburn."

Chimed in board member Julie Dillon, "I guess I would say ditto to boardmember Johnson. I have had heart-

burn for quite a while, and everybody's heard me talk about this. I am also not an architect, but I am really concerned about the boxiness of it. I am fully in support of the project, but I am troubled by this building."

Project critic Bruce Coons, executive director of Save Our Heritage Organisation (SOHO), a pro-preservation advocacy group, argues that "The current design looks like the cooling tower of a power plant. This just doesn't make the grade as a great new piece of architecture or historic preservation. The early design has been watered down, and it's just become a boring, ugly appendage. It's an abomination, and almost everybody else agrees. We think San Diego deserves better."

Skeptics say they can't help comparing the situation to the long-standing controversy at the San Diego Unified School District. In that case, Superintendent Alan Bersin, backed by the Union-*Tribune* and various downtown business interests, along with his mother-in-law Pauline Foster, is pitted against the teachers' union and a variety of other critics of his policies regarding district purchasing, contracting, real estate development, and educational issues. Irwin Jacobs, for whom the depot museum is to be named, also is a major Bersin supporter; in 2000 Jacobs gave \$100,000 to an ultimately unsuccessful effort to defeat Bersin's school-board foe, Frances O'Neill Zimmerman.

"It's very sad," concludes Winton. "We are not anti-art. That is the tack they took, accusing us of that, and it kind of threw me off base. We are not anti-art, we are anti-poor architecture." — Matt Potter



The First Time

Sometimes, sex between teenagers happens as it happens in the movies: locked in a stranger's bedroom at a loud party; crushed in the sweaty backseat of a car; in a shared hotel room on prom night; hushed so as not to wake sleeping parents. 
The nine teenagers who speak here are not a scientific sample, but they make clear the diversity in youthful attitudes toward sex. In any high school classroom, there is likely someone who thinks sexual intercourse is sinful, someone who thinks it's impressive, someone who thinks it's reprehensible, someone who thinks it's frightening, many who think it's fun, dirty, fulfilling, cool.

JESSICA

Jessica lives alone with her mother in a large and lavishly furnished house. In her bedroom, a Christina Aguilera poster hangs on the wall above a wide black bookcase crammed with books. Concert tickets and pictures of friends, many of them taken at parties, crowd a tower of shoeboxes beside the window.

Jessica's father was asked to leave after a violent incident with her older brother, who is now away at college. Her parents are still friendly, and Jessica claims that her dad is still in love with her mom.

Jessica herself will depart for college next fall. When she does, she'll leave behind two lovers who could not be more different, two young men whose personalities verify Jessica's hesitant claim to a "dual personality."



Tyler and I were together for one month before we started having sex, but you have to consider that when we started dating, we had been best friends for a year and were already totally close and completely in love. We talked about it, and I was, like, "I'm not ready, I'm not ready, I'm not ready," and then one day I was. The first time was totally unexpected. Usually we had a pretty healthy amount of sex, but then we had this two-month period where we didn't have sex at all because we were fighting so much. Tyler was having issues with his dad. His dad is hyper-Christian, and he fucks with his head a lot, tries to instill those values in him. At the end of that time we decided to take a break, and Tyler moved out. We got back

We're both really weird on the inside. He's completely unashamed of it and completely doesn't hide it; he doesn't know how to. I'm really good at hiding it...at hiding what a strange person I am. Tyler wanted to work through our problems,



but I was, like, "You know what? No." I broke up with him, and he was, like, "Well, if you're over it, then there's nothing we can do." Tyler is still in love with me. He wants to get his life together, and he wants me to get my life together, so that in a bunch of years we can get back together and get married. I don't know if that will happen, but I don't think so. I'm always going to love him, I'll always be grateful to him for every moment of everything. I learned so much and I still think he's an amazing person. We just fall into our old patterns too easily now, and I think we would even in four years, five years.

on anything. He was the one that would always have protection. After about a month there were a few times when he didn't; and those first few times we would have sex without a condom, nothing would happen, so we just would think it was fine. I guess it was around February of my freshman year that I got pregnant, and I found out three months later that I was pregnant.

Luis went with me after school to a clinic in Mission Bay, and we were both just shocked. It was, like, happy, but more shocked because it was so long that we were doing it without any protection. When they told me I still didn't believe it.

I was never brought up to believe in abortion. My parents would never support it, and his parents would definitely not support it. Both of our parents are Catholic. From there we went to my mom's house and called my dad, and he came over. Luis was just sitting behind me and talking to them, and my mom was just screaming, asking how it could happen and saying she thought I was smarter than that. My dad is more — I'm like his spoiled little girl, so he did get mad at me, but he was more saying how he was going to support me 100 percent. He took Luis outside and told him that he was being nice and that if he felt like it he could go out-

side and stop a police car and — Luis was already over 18. He told Luis that if he couldn't take responsibility for me — he didn't want Luis to be with me just for that ---- that he could take care of his daughter.

In the month between my mom's death and my son's birth, I was mostly in my room crying. Luis was there all the time. He helped me with everything. When you're that


age, you just don't care about eating. I had to worry about getting all my milk things and everything. Luis would always remind me, tell me when we had an appointment.

at the beginning of my junior year. I had done home study to make up for sophomore year. People at school were really nice to me.

I really enjoy just sleeping in the same room with Luis every night. Gabriel goes to bed by eight o'clock, nine at the latest. Even though we are really tired after that, we still enjoy being together. After I had my baby, I got birth-control [pills], which is a pain, but we have to be really careful.

When Luke mentions football, which is quite often, his face splits into a grin so wide he can hardly get his words out. I first learned about dating rules around when I entered junior high. Dating before the age of 16 didn't come up so much for me. But I know with my sisters, my parents are very strict about enforcing it, because it is what the Prophet said, and you need to follow the word of God. because I believe in it." Some people like to have a logical explanation. For me, it's enough that the Prophet said it; but I'm also a scientific thinker, and things have to make sense. The logic behind it is that before you're 16 you're not really mature enough to handle a relationship. Someone in the middle of puberty is just beginning to get used to themselves and is not ready for a relationship with spiritual depth.

I had a girlfriend in the winter and spring of this year. She was LDS, a Mormon. We were really serious about not going beyond the rules or guidelines set down by the leaders of the church. It didn't really come up because we both understood why they put them there and how it would affect us if we did. It was really an understanding from the beginning.

I met her when we were being trained to be peer counselors, because we did training with other high schools. And then we went on a date, and then we just went steady from then on, until about the first week of March. I broke up with her; things just weren't the same as when we started. And I didn't want to have to break up with her after prom, because that would



have been even harder, and I respect her. And I knew we wouldn't be in the same place this fall. She's not going to BYU, so I didn't want to have to spend the summer together and then have a tragedy.

When I see other Mormons at school who don't follow the Gospel, who don't follow the dating rules, it makes me sad, because they have the direct word of God and they've thrown it away. I don't want to feel angry, but I feel frustrated and disappointed when I ask a Mormon why he does certain things and he says, "Well, so-and-so does it, and he's Mormon, so what's the difference?" And not that reputation is everything, but it certainly does make a difference if Mormons have a good rep at school.

On the football team it was always an interesting topic. For game day, on Fridays, we would watch pump-up movies before we played. Think about really testosterone-driven movies; they're usually R rated. Mormons are suggested not to watch R movies. At the time it was a big problem, because I felt very loyal to the team, and I felt that I couldn't dishonor my brothers and say to my fellow players that we shouldn't watch those movies, because I was part of the group. I didn't want to sit out and not be

part of the team, but I knew that I shouldn't view those movies. So what I did was, I would go, and then I would sleep. I would just put my jersey over my head and sleep.

My mom hated everything they taught us in school about sex and contraception. She thought they were just putting in bad ideas and that they weren't emphasizing what needed to be emphasized. Obviously the school cannot put in a moral code, they can only supply data. But if you don't have a guideline, that data can be misconstrued: "Oh, contraception. I can have sex because I won't get pregnant because I can use a condom or go on the pill." As for me, I didn't really mind too much when they talked about sex. I just took the information like a scientist would, purely observational data. When my teacher said something provocative, I would just think in my head, "That's immoral. Why are you saying that to me?" But I never said out loud that I thought his teaching was inappropriate. I wanted an A.

Personally, there were a lot of things helping me resist whatever hormonal impulses I have. One thing is that doing anything immoral jeopardizes both of our chances to get into heaven. The laws that the church put into place are to protect you from even starting to circle down. I don't want to bring dishonor to my family. I want to be able to tell my future wife that I waited for her and that she is the one I want to be with for eternity. You find someone that makes you complete, and then you say, now we can be together forever and be a great couple.

It's hard, when you're with a girl, you're thinking about how pretty she is and you just want to be next to her and close to her. I think it helps that I'm really persistent and driven and dedicated. One thing I think helps, something that other Christian religions don't have, is spirituality, the good feelings I get from doing the right thing, from knowing I'm on a good page with the Lord. Mormons are told to pray about everything, to have an open relationship with the Heavenly Father, so I'm banking on that to always be there and always help me. I'm not saying it's going to be easy. But I really believe that God will not put me through trials that I can't win. He wants you to succeed.

The Lord puts these hormones into us for a reason: the reason is, when you do find that perfect someone, you want to be attracted to them on that level. That way you have a good relationship. But as a teenager we have to control those feelings. It's hard. It's like grabbing a bull by the horns. But if I can't control them now, how would I control them when I'm a married adult and see a really good-looking girl in the office? The sex drive is always going to be there, until you're 90 or something. Scripture says, "Natural man is the enemy of God."

Hormones are like the hair growing out of your head, the color of your irises, the white blood cells in your circulatory system.

When I went back to visit Texas, after we broke



up, I had sex in mind when I went over to her house. She let me have sex with her. She seemed to take it as me wanting her back, but I was just horny. She wanted me back. My mom is in a hospital like those places where old people go to get care. She has AIDS now. I've been with my grandparents since I was, like, two days old, that's why I call my grandma Ma.

I don't know who my dad is. I don't even know my real dad's last name. I don't know his name period. My little brother's outside playing all the time, he's 10. My brother, he's a terrible 10. Loves to play-fight. I have an older sister, but she's probably at work at Barona Casino. She's 28. My sister, her daughter passed away when she was a year old. She was 19 when she had that baby. I'm a sophomore in high school.

My first time having sex was with my boyfriend Brian. I lost my virginity to him when I was 13. Brian say he lost his virginity to me, but I doubt that, the kind of boy he is. He's a thug. I started going out with him when I was 11. We were together for two years before we did anything. We were together six months before I even kissed him. He knew better.



Me and Brian never used contraception. I was on the pill, but I always forgot, so I just stopped taking it. And I don't want the shot, 'cause you can get cancer from the shot. Unprotected sex is scary, but it's okay, because I never got pregnant; I have no STDs; I don't have nothin'. Oh my God, that's so good. I get tested every four months, I make sure I don't have no diseases. I get tested at Kaiser. I have insurance because my grandpa was in the Navy for 20-something years and then he worked at Kaiser. I don't know what he did; but he will tell you, he will tell you, because my dad loves bragging about working at Kaiser. It's so good I didn't catch nothing, I prayed and I'm thankful, I'm so thankful I didn't catch nothin'.

I regret having sex with Brian. I wanted my first time to be so special. It was at his house. We were in his room, and I was, like, "No, I'm not ready." And he was, like, "Are you sure?" And I said, "Mm-mm, I'm not ready." And then he started playing Playstation; so I closed my eyes and listened to the CD player, and then he started kissing me, and it went from there.

At first we had sex once a month. Last year we did it every Friday. I guess sex was okay with him, but it didn't matter to me if it was or not. If he was happy, I was happy. I do lo-o-ove him. That's my man, I'm gonna marry him. I was in love with him at the time, I still am.

Last year he had sexual intercourse with this girl named Jenna behind my back and I was at home on restriction. I was grounded for getting bad grades, and I couldn't go nowhere, so I guess he wanted to have sex so bad he cheated on me.

But I haven't done anything in ten months, no sexual intercourse. That's 'cause Thanksgiving last year, Brian got locked up. Him and his friends stole a car, and then he ran from the cops.

I got a letter from him

yesterday sayin' he still love me, he wanna be with me. I don't know if I believe it. Around January he wrote and said he don't wanna be with me. I never cheated on him. I don't believe in

cheating. I don't believe in it. What goes around comes around, I know that.

In December when I was in eighth grade, we were around the corner from my house, and it was

I dropped the case because those boys, they lived around the corner from me, and if I would have kept the case they would have shot my house up, because you know where I live. It's all Blood [gang] territory.

I wish I was a virgin. I lost my virginity when I was so young. I wish I lost my virginity to my boyfriend Chris. I didn't have sex with him. I felt so special he loved me. All the girls wanted him. And he's from St. Louis, and he has that accent, and I lo-o-ove the accent. And his favorite rapper, we have so much in common, 'cause his favorite rapper is Nelly, and I love Nelly. And I like boys with earrings. Oh, Il-o-oove boys with earrings. But now he don't call me no more.

In May I got shot, right there in front of the library. I got shot in my leg. Me and my best friend, by my house we were walking up the hill, and some boys shot us for no reason with a .22. I'm okay now, but they kept the bullet in my leg. We just walkin', and they shot us for no reason, and we yelling for help. I didn't even know I got shot. It was just like firecrackers, 'cause the boys were behind us, but we wasn't paying attention. Those boys that shot me, they're locked up right now, all of them.

where, something bad happens to me. Now that I got shot, everything I do, I'm scared. Everything I do. I stay around by my house. I will never go anywhere by myself.

I think whenever I have sex again with Brian, I'll try to block it out of me. I'll get scared, but I'll try to block it out of me. Brian knows about it, he says that the boys that shot me, he already said when he gets out he wants to get them back.

Every time I go some-

I guess you would say, oldfashioned values; but she didn't really instill these in me in a very forceful way. She would say, "Wait till you're married," but she's not the sort to talk about hell and stuff like that. Since I was raised mostly by my mother, I ended up adopting her values. I think the way my mother raised me, at least in that respect, in the respect of teaching about sexual morality and things like that was — was proper, because she never gave me any angry speeches or anything like that. I think it's important that parents don't

force their beliefs on their kids but rather say, "This is what my beliefs are; this is what all the facts are; and it's your choice, but this is what I think is best."

So I do take a somewhat traditional view: ideally, I think someone should only engage in sexual activity with someone that they love and preferably someone that they're married to. I wouldn't say I've eased up in my views, but I've eased up in how much I condemn permissive sexual behavior. It used to really bother me if I saw it in a movie, even James Bond movies, but not so much anymore.

If you want to talk about sin, a sin is what hurts other people. If no one is being hurt by it, at least not intentionally, then it's hard to have much of a problem with it. But what I think is that sex, even between two consenting partners ---two adults or two teenagers - can end up hurting them even though neither one is trying to hurt the other. I think people don't recognize the emotional power that sexuality has over them and [they] can be too casual about it.

There are millions and millions of boys and girls getting their hearts broken, and I think it makes it all the harder if they've actually had a sexual relationship. It makes it much worse.

I think when a man and woman get married, it's just human nature that the man would like to think he's the only one she's ever had and for her to want to be the only girl he's ever had. Maybe that's an uptight feeling, but I think it's unavoidable. I don't think abstinence is imposed on everyone. I think for some people, not for all people, but for some, abstinence is a natural inclination.

Much more important than not engaging in sexual relations before you're married is not engaging in sexual relations before you're in love and you trust the person. I think it's actually morally preferable to have sexual relations with someone you're in love with and not married to than someone you're married to and not in love with. I'm actually pretty cynical about marriage. I think a lot of marriages are based on things they shouldn't be


based on, like money, or feeling a need for someone but not really caring about them.

I don't think it's that much to ask for kids to be sexually abstinent. Kids can relieve themselves through masturbation and all that, or just through kissing, and that could be satisfying enough. I think people underestimate the resistance kids can show to their natural inclinations.

Even though I have what you would call oldfashioned or conservative social values, I think a lot of people blur the line

between conservative political values and conservative social values, and they think they're the same thing, because Republicans will tend to believe in abstinence in all that, and it's just not the same thing. I'm very liberal politically, and I think it's a fallacy that people with liberal political views have permissive sexual behaviors. I think they're completely unrelated. I think that if young people are sexually active and not wanting to have a child, I think it's definitely their obligation to use some form of birth control. I completely accept homosexuality.

I think it's rare for two teenagers to be really in love, because I think that you have to have strong beliefs before you fall in love, because I think that one major aspect of love is respecting someone else's moral character. I think if you haven't really decided what your beliefs are, and many teenagers haven't, then it's harder for someone to have a really deep relationship.

I think if someone was watching me every day, someone would probably say, he hasn't really chosen not to have sex, that's just what happened, and he says that's what he believes in, in order to justify not having sex. I think if my beliefs were different, I would have gone about my life differently, been more flirtatious maybe. I don't go to a lot of parties. I don't drink or do drugs. So I haven't been in a lot of situations where I would be that tempted. But I think as far back as when I was nine or ten and first learning about sexuality, I've had these beliefs, so I don't think it's just because of my circumstance.





got to know each other and we hung out, we hung out with a big group, we hung out just us. I knew that it could be the beginning of something good, and it was.

day. I told him from that first time we talked on the phone that I was 16. Looking back on it, I think it might have been an act, but at the time he seemed genuinely shocked and made a big show out of saying he didn't normally see girls my age. He made it seem like I was responsible for it.


Self-Righteous





The pace of West African dance varies widely. "For the yankadi, which is a dance of flirtation and seduction, it's slow and flowing. But for the dance that traditionally follows that one, the makru, it's fast and fiery, since it's about what happens after the seduction — the celebration of the connection with the partner.'

Drummers use several different sizes and shapes of drums, including ones called the dun dun and the djembe. This weekend at Clay's workshop, the

drumming will be performed by L.A.based Jason Hann. When Clay met Camara, she

found his teaching style refreshing. She also appreciated the lack of racial tension in his classes, she says. "Abdoulaye doesn't put up with it. Here [in the United States] there was always some tension when the whites took classes," says Clay, whose ethnic background is German, Romanian, and English

Were proprietary feelings the problem? "Yeah. 'This is the only thing we can really say is ours. Please don't take it away from us.' It's gotten better, but there are still places where it's very — I guess you could call it 'competitive.' "

What does Clay tell people who expect her to be African-American? "If somebody calls to ask about my classes, I may tell them that I'm not, just in case they don't want to study with somebody who isn't. Sometimes they ask me questions that lead to that information in a roundabout way."

As a performer in a West African dance troupe, Clay has also faced the issue of audience expectations. "We have had trouble in the past, especially if it's a performance geared to African history or Martin Luther King Day. Our group tries to keep it 50-50 between African-Americans and whites. But if the African-Americans aren't available, some people in the audience have been anywhere from disappointed to almost violently opposed to whites performing."

When Camara was in San Diego, he and Clay visited schools. "We did a workshop at my daughter's high school, San Dieguito Academy. At that level, they went wild, because they recognized it as the roots of hip-hop.'

Do the techniques favor any particular body shape? Or any particular personality type? "As far as body type, anything goes, from petite to round and heavy." The latter, says Clay, "have more to shake, and that can be an asset. One of my teachers was close to six feet tall and probably 200 pounds. She could jump in the air and hit the ground soundlessly. She's a good example of the upper range. Personality types? Many times introverts find this is a way to free themselves. The drums bring them out. Often I'll say in class, 'Let the drums dance you.'

Who doesn't do well at this kind of dancing? "Former ballet students," says Clay. "They have the hardest time forgetting their old-school rules."



OUTDOORS

Atmospheric Ice-Crystal Effects are often observed starting about this time of year, because of the frequent appearance of high clouds made of tiny bits of ice. The most familiar of these optical effects is the 22°-radius halo, or ring, around the sun or the moon. Less often seen is a "corona" (a colored disk around the sun or moon - not the same as the solar corona seen during total eclipse); 'sundogs" (colored arcs left and right of the sun); the sun pillar (a vertical column of light above the rising or setting sun); and a host of other rare and inconspicuous optical phenomena. All of the optical effects mentioned are a consequence of sunlight or moonlight refracting through or reflecting from the tiny facets of ice crystals in cirrus and other types of high clouds.

"Rainbow Season" arrives with the first rains of late fall. Scattered showers are best for rainbow watching: sunlight refracting and reflecting through the raindrops causes two bows to appear -an intense circular arc at 42°, and a bigger but weaker arc at 51° from the antisolar point (the point in the sky diametrically opposed to the sun's position). From November through mid-February, the sun never gets higher than 42° above the horizon as seen from San Diego, so (rain and sunlight permitting) the brighter of the two arcs may appear above the horizon at any time of day. In spring and summer, rainbows are never seen in the sky around midday because the sun is too high —and the antisolar point is too low.

The Fremont Cottonwoods along the San Diego River in Mission Gorge are now showing their best tawny foliage. You can park at the Old Mission Dam historic site (west

of Santee) and explore the river area on foot by scrambling along the river banks, or by walking, bike riding, or skating along the bike path above the river's south and east banks. Large cottonwoods can also be seen along other watercourses throughout the San Diego County backcountry, including along the Sweetwater River near Cottonwood Golf Course and in Cottonwood Valley, east of Pine Valley along Interstate 8.

Liquidamber Trees, or sweet gums, the deciduous trees gracing front yards, parks, and campuses throughout the San Diego area, have been putting on a colorful show for the past couple of weeks. The maplelike leaves of some varieties turn to purple or red; the leaves of other varieties fade to golden yellow. Still other varieties hold on to their green leaves until sometime in December. Most liquidambers in our area regain their light green foliage by late February.

In Search of Old Carriage Houses, head out to explore Golden Hill with Walkabout perambulators on Friday, November 22. 



If you have the fortitude to tackle some killer ups and downs, try the surprisingly challenging hiking route to El Cajon Mountain, a picturesque East County landmark. Your primary destination is the 3675foot-high point along the mountain's summit ridge. A side trip, with considerable extra effort, can take you to the top of the sheer south escarpment of the same mountain, a feature known as El Capitan.

From Mapleview Street in Lakeside, just east of Highway 67, drive 4.2 miles north on Wildcat Canyon Road to the El Capitan Open-Space Preserve trailhead parking lot on the right.

With small exceptions, the route follows an unpaved road bulldozed on public (former BLM) land by miners many years ago. Currently, parts of the mining road are being incorporated into the Trans-County Trail, which will eventually stretch from Los Peñasquitos Lagoon near Del Mar to Borrego Springs.

At present, you're directed east from the parking lot along an access road leading to the private Blue Sky Ranch. After bypassing the ranch property and ascending a short, steep

walking 0.2 mile, you reach a 3367-foot summit featuring a very nice panoramic view west and south. By turning left (east) you can follow a narrow but well-beaten path threading 0.5 mile through thick chaparral and around jumbo-sized boulders to El Cajon Mountain's rounded summit. The view from there is panoramic in all directions.

The third, most difficult alternative is a 1.4-mile-long trek straight ahead (south) from the saddle, using a severely eroded and partially overgrown roadbed. This route takes you to the sheer brow of El Capitan. Walk out to the edge, beyond the end of the old roadbed, and descend over boulders 50 or 100 yards for a pseudo-aerial view of the San Diego River Valley and El Capitan Reservoir, complete with toylike boats floating on its blue surface.

Even without these options, the roundtrip distance to the saddle and back is 11 miles with elevation gains of about 4000 feet. This is a serious effort, requiring five to eight hours of hiking time, and lots and lots of water, even in late autumn.







A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR: Fran Gage was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. "I grew up," she said, on the day that we talked, "in a very Irish Catholic family, so I went to the local parochial school. When it was time for me to go to high school, there wasn't a nearby Catholic high school, so I got a reprieve and I got to go to the public school, which was a big deal for me at that time.

"I'll bet they had awful school lunches," I said.

Ms. Gage noted that she recently had considered writing about school lunches. She went on, saying, "The last couple of years I went to parochial school, they built a cafeteria, and this was supposed to be a wonderful addition to the school. I can vividly remember some of the food. And, of course, because the nuns ran the cafeteria, you had to eat everything that was on your plate. You couldn't waste your food. I can remember devising ways of dashing out the door and throwing things in the garbage. One thing I remember particularly was some sort of a green bean casserole probably made with canned green beans. They're already cooked to death. Then they were put in a casserole with some sort of mystery liquid and then cooked even longer. It was awful, just awful. Finally I said to my mother that I was not going to eat these lunches anymore, that I was going to come home for lunch. And I did. It was a decent walk. It was close to a mile. But I preferred to walk home for lunch rather than go through the horrors of those lunches.

Ms. Gage, when time came for college, went to Catholic University in Washington, D.C. "My parents," she said, "were lob-bying for me to stay in Pittsburgh, but I really didn't want to do that, and this was a school that I knew that they would think was acceptable. I was a nursing student."

After receiving her degree, Ms. Gage said that for several years she worked in the D.C. area. "First," she said, "in a hospital and then as a public health nurse. And then I met the man who is now my husband. He was in the Army when we met. After he got out, he decided to take up some job possibilities that he had looked at when he was in graduate school at Stanford. And one of them was in San Francisco working for an accounting firm. So he called up the folks who had interviewed him, and they said, 'Come on out.' So we packed our stuff and drove to California. This was 1969. I went to graduate school and got a master's degree in community mental health nursing, and then I worked for a while. Then we moved to Brussels for three years."

Brussels, Ms. Gage said, "was a wonderful time in our lives. Shortly after we moved to California, we took a trip on a motorcycle through France that really changed the way I thought about food. It was really quite a revelation - the whole trip. The motorcycle was a BMW, which we picked up at the factory. I spoke not a word of French, and Sidney's French was from high school and college. We were on a very strict budget. We spent most of the time in little towns in the countryside, although we were in Paris very briefly. While we were in Paris, my husband went to visit the office of an international accounting firm. He went to visit the office to see if he could wrangle some sort of a deal so that he could work there for a while. They said, 'You have to go home first and have some more experience.' So we came back to San Francisco and he worked. Finally the firm said, 'Yes,' that he could go to Paris. But then six weeks before we were going to go, they decided that their Paris office was overrun with Americans, and we would have to go to Brussels. We didn't even know where Brussels was. We

"And," I said, "the food was good."

"The food was amazing. I shopped on a little street, where you went from one store to the next and bought eggs and bread." "Were you much of a cook when you married?"

"No, no. After coming back from France I got intrigued with cooking. And that's when I started to teach myself how to cook. Actually, my husband and I both were interested in cooking. I could make sort of a spaghetti sauce that my mother used to make. I could make meatloaf. But, no, I was not that much of a cook.

'So, after we got home from France, I started teaching myself how to cook. I used Mastering the Art of French Cooking. I never actually went to a cooking class. I was concentrating on the book. And then I got to the point where I felt bold enough to actually have little cooking classes in my house. Very small groups of people would come, and we would cook dinner and sit down and eat it. I was one step ahead of the students, reading along with Julia and making simple things. People liked it. It was fun.

"And then we went to Brussels, and then when I came home I did a few more cooking classes, and our daughter was born, and then I went back to work as a nurse. And then I got really intrigued by pastry. I really wanted to learn more about pastry and how you make those really fabulous French cakes with tiny little layers and jewel-box looks to them.

"So I went back to Paris one summer and studied at La Varenne. I came back, and by then I was completely crazed about French pastry. I taught pastry classes at home during the evening. Then I decided that I really had to do something with all this passion and exuberance about French pastry, so I quit my job, and I stayed home and worked up a repertoire of pastry. My idea was that I was going to sell pastry to restaurants.

"I went out and I actually found clients. I had this all figured out, that I would sell pastry to restaurants for their dinner service. But I got really worried. I was doing this at a great pace — and, of course, the health department frowns on this sort of thing. You can't do this kind of work from your house. People were in our house at all hours and were working constantly. But then a place across the street became available. It wasn't a bakery, but it was a commercial spot and a rather unusual situation, because the block is not a commercial block but rather a residential block. My husband said, 'Why don't you move across the street?' So that's what I did."

The bakery — the Fran Gage Pâtisserie Française — almost immediately was successful. Word-of-mouth brought new customers to purchase Ms. Gage's croissants, her whole-wheat bread with walnuts, her fruit tarts and made-to-order birthday cakes. The shop became a San Francisco institution. Soon after Ms. Gage opened the Pâtisserie, Gerald Asher, at that time Gourmet's wine editor, included Ms. Gage's shop in an article for his magazine about food and wine shopping in San Francisco.

Several years after Gerald Asher's Gourmet mention of the Fran Gage Pâtisserie Française, Mr. Asher was entertaining the then rather elderly English food revolutionary Elizabeth David. Mr. Asher had his limo driver stop outside the Pâtisserie. Mr. Asher went in to buy bread. He explained to Ms. Gage that Elizabeth David was not feeling well enough to dismount the limo and walk inside. He left with the bread. The limo remained at the curb. Then, Asher again exited the limo, this time helping Elizabeth David walk into the Pâtisserie.

I asked Ms. Gage what she recalled from that visit.

"Well, Gerald used to come to the bakery on occasion because he lives here in the city. And then that one day he came with Elizabeth David. She was very old. And at first, as you know, she was not even going to come into the store with Gerald because she wasing this yeast-risen pumpkin bread, and she decided she had to come in and see it. It was just really remarkable. I was just flabbergasted that she was actually in the store. I don't think I even said anything coherent. I probably just stood there looking goofy. It was just so exciting. The whole thing was so exciting.'

We talked, then, about Ms. Gage's new book. I asked how she'd describe the book.

"It's a collection of stories about food, and the stories are memories: they're visits to people who either grow or produce the food in question, butter or sugar or eggs or almonds. And I have written what you might call 'tributes' to those foods. And then there are recipes after the stories."

I said to Ms. Gage how much I liked her stories and her visits to henhouses and dairies and orchards. I asked, then, thinking of the fondness that in her text she expressed for eggs, "Do you still eat eggs for breakfast?"

She sighed and said, "I don't very much anymore. Unfortunately, because of my cholesterol level, which is problematic, and that's enough to drive me crazy. All the years I had a bakery, I didn't eat tons of pastry, but certainly I tasted lots of it. And now that I'm not around it anymore, I have to be a little more careful about the butter and eggs and things that I eat. Although I would much rather eat butter than meat. I would give up meat. I can do without meat, actually, as long as I can have butter occasionally. Eggs are so important to pastry that I figure that if I want a nice piece of pastry, I'll just go lightly on some of the other things that I shouldn't be eating."

"Can you explain," I asked, "how egg whites will cause a batter to rise?"

"Egg whites are mostly protein. And so they really give structure to desserts. What's so interesting about egg whites, I think, is that when you beat them, there's air trapped in between the molecules, and then when air heats, that air expands, and that's what makes soufflés and *genoise* and other kinds of cakes rise. It's really quite extraordinary when you think about it."

"What do the yolks contribute to baking?"

"The yolks are mostly fat, so they tenderize things, and they also give a taste, I think, and also add sort of a nice, rich palate feel to whatever it is that they're in because of their fat." "You describe eggs, almonds, sugar, and butter as the DNA

of desserts."

I said that back when Ms. Gage had her bakery, she must have used, literally, tons of eggs.

"We did. We got them in boxes that had flats of 30 eggs in each flat, and now I can't even remember how many flats were in those boxes. It was five or six, I think. And we would get those delivered. The same people who brought those brought 60-pound blocks of butter."

"How would you use a 60-pound block of butter?"

"First what we did was chop it into more manageable pieces and wrap them and then keep them in the walk-in refrigerator. Then when we were making, for instance, butter cream, we would drag out a couple of blocks and beat them up and put that aside and then make the custard part of the butter cream and cool it in a mixer, and when it was cool and thick and beautiful looking, we would throw in this softened butter to finish it. Or we would soften it and roll it in between sheets of dough to make croissants. We used a lot of butter and a lot of eggs."

I asked which of the recipes in *A Sweet Quartet* she would suggest for someone who had elementary baking skills.

"Several of the cookie recipes are very easy. And actually, the molasses spice cake is a very easy thing to make. And it's very nice. The pound cakes are good. And they're really not hard to make, but the molasses cake is easier to make. When I was making recipes for this book, I tried different kinds of molasses for the molasses cake. I even ordered some cane syrup from Steen's in Louisiana. You can order this stuff on the Internet. I used some of their molasses to make that cake that I really, really liked. So if people wanted to play around with different brands of molasses and different kinds of grains of molasses, that would make it fun for them. It does change the taste. You could put dried fruit in it, too — all kinds of dried fruit — cranberries or pears or raisins."

I asked why Ms. Gage called for rye flour in the molasses cake. "Because I started out thinking of a *pain d'épice* when I was

thinking about this recipe. Not that a *pain d'épice* has molasses in it; it uses honey. We used to make a *pain d'épice* at the bakery, and it had a fair amount of rye flour in it. And I thought that it

just might give it a little more substance somehow, because that's certainly what it does for a *pain d'épice*. So I tried that. Now I've also been making yeast-risen bread with a very small amount of rye flour, even smaller than this amount, that gives it a very slightly different taste."

"Could you talk about the buttermilk, what it does in a recipe like this?"

"That also has a sort of a tenderizing effect, just because of its acidity. And it also sort of counteracts the molasses and the brown sugar and helps mellow the whole taste. You could use regular milk, too, but buttermilk somehow is better."

"What, exactly, is buttermilk?"

"Real buttermilk is what's left over after people make cheese. Commercial buttermilk, I'm sure, is some simpler version. I don't exactly know how they make commercial buttermilk. I'm sure it's not exactly that same way."

"Do you recommend any particular kinds of flour, any brands?"

"When I test recipes I usually use grocery-store flour because I figure probably that's what people are going to use. Although, when I make bread, I buy flour from a place where I used to buy flour when I had the bakery, which is a company in San Francisco called Giusto's [*www.giustos.com*]. I like their flour. They have quite a variety. They have some organic flours, and some of the wholewheat flours are stone ground as opposed to milled. But, generally speaking, I don't advocate their flour because people can't go and buy it."

"When you test a recipe like a molasses spice cake, how do you test it? Do you make it two or three times?"

"It depends. Sometimes two or three, sometimes more. This cake, I can't remember how many times I made it, but first I sit down and I think about what the taste is that I want and how I'm going to get that. There are actually rather tight parameters in baking: if you have this much solid, then you need this much leavening, and so you figure those things out. This cake really doesn't have much fat in it at all, so I didn't have to worry about those kinds of proportions. And then I try it and see what it tastes

like, and the spices, were they enough? Did I need a little more? I probably made this a couple of times before it came out the way I wanted it.

"Then I had a group of people who agreed to test recipes for me, so I would send them the recipe and also a questionnaire that asks various questions about the recipe. They would make it and send the questionnaires back to me. If there were problems that

they encountered, then I would look at those and make the recipe again.

"I also ask people if they can send me snapshots of the finished product. The photos can reveal a lot. I'll look at these photographs and say, 'Wow, that's not exactly what I had in mind!' Then, I will be able to change the directions to get the result I want.

'The people who test these recipes are not professionals; that's real important, too. They're people who like to cook, who like to bake, but never professionals. So the fact that it works for them, then it should work for other people out there who are going to pick up the recipe and try it.

"It's difficult to write recipes because you're trying to get across very specific information in a clear way, but also in an interesting way without taking up pages and pages trying to describe things. It's not easy."

Baking temperatures are extremely important, Ms. Gage said. "Temperature has so much to do with cooking, obviously, but particularly in pastry making. Even if you're trying to make a pound cake and the butter is cold, then the eggs are cold, you're not going to get the same result. They have to be warmer, and it has to be close to the same temperature. If you're rolling croissant dough, or you're putting butter in croissant dough, it's the same thing. The temperature of the croissant dough itself has to

be pretty much the same temperature as the butter and the same texture. Otherwise, it's not going to work. And then it has to do with temperature, really. At the bakery we often didn't have that luxury of having everything at just the correct temperature. We would have cold butter when we needed it to be warmer, so there are tricks you can do. A blowtorch, for instance, is a pastry maker's best friend.

Ms. Gage not only teaches her reader about eggs, butter, almonds, and sugar; she also visits milk cows and their owners, a butter maker, a hatchery, and sugar producers. I said to her, "The moment when this occurred to you, that you could make these visits to the producers of these ingredients, must have been a wonderful moment."

"It was. And these visits make the book more immediate. That's what the visits did for me, and I'm hoping that's what I can convev to the reader.

'Did you milk one of the cows?"

"No, no. I thought about that; before I went there, I thought, 'Maybe she will let me milk her cow.' But then when I talked to her, I realized that that was really something that she did. Only she milked that cow. And even if someone else had to milk it, she would pasteurize the milk, not that she didn't trust the other person. So I thought that it would probably be an insult to ask her if I could milk her cow. Plus I knew nothing about milking a cow. And I'm sure you just don't pick this up the first time. Probably it would traumatize the poor animal. So I gave up on that. That was one of my thoughts, but I gave that up.

Heritage of the Americas Museum, more than 100 Chinese jades of the Late Neolithic (4300-2500 BC) through the Ming periods (AD 1368-1644) are included in "The Stone of Heaven: The Enduring Art of Jade Age China." From ancient times, jades in China were treasured as talismans, worn on the body either as final adornments in death or as proudly worn ornaments in life. Jades were symbols of dignity and rank (as early as the Late Stone Age) and were status symbols closely connected with the conviction that jade brought long life. A new acquisition is now on exhibit: a rare and valu1¹/₃ cups (6²/₃ ounces) unbleached all-purpose flour

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Put a disk of parchment paper in the bottom of a 9-by-3-inch cake pan.

Sift the all-purpose and rye flours, baking soda, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and salt together. Add the anise seeds.

Beat the butter in the bowl of a heavy-duty mixer with a paddle until it is creamy and smooth. Add the brown sugar, and beat until the mixture lightens in color. Beat in the molasses. Crack the egg into a small bowl and break it up with a fork. With the mixer running, dribble it into the butter and sugar.

Alternately add the dry ingredients and the buttermilk to the mixer, starting and ending with the dry ingredients. Stop and scrape down the sides of the bowl when necessary. Mix in the raisins.

Pour the batter into the pan, and smooth the top with a spatula.

Bake the cake on the middle shelf of the oven until it is puffed and a skewer inserted into the center comes out clean, about 30 minutes.

Cool the cake, still in the pan, on a rack. Invert the cake onto a plate, peel off the parchment paper, then put it on a serving plate, right side up. Serve it at room temperature.

able jade burial suit of the Han dvnasty (206 BC to AD 221), one of only about two dozen that have been excavated in China. The suits were made of more than 2000 square and rectangular plates of jade sewn together with threads of gold, silver, or bronze (depending upon the status of the wearer). 





Risky Business

he San Diego Early Music Society took something of a risk in including Paul O'Dette's program of Spanish music in its series at St. James by-the-Sea. O'Dette himself is no problem — anything but. He is, in fact, one

of the premier lutenists of our age, and a master of a whole range of plucked instruments and their music from the Renaissance and Baroque. He shines in the serious lute literature: his complete traversal of Dow-

land's lute music is magisterial. O'Dette is equally at home in the lighter repertoire of the period: dance tunes, song arrangements, and the like. Typical of the delightful performances he can give of this music are such O'Dette CDs as Alla Venetiana, on which he plays early-16th-century lute music in the Veneto, and Robin Hood, devoted to Elizabethan ballad settings, performed variously on lute, orpharion, and cittern.

This time, however, the vehicle for O'Dette's talents — during the first half of the St. James program, at least - was the vihuela, the chosen instrument of a number of brilliant 16th-century Spanish composers. The vihuela is smaller than the lute, and has a flatter back. It looks like a very small guitar. And it has a very small sound. In this property, it closely resembles the clavichord (otherwise a totally different kind of instrument). which I wrote about a few weeks ago. As with the clavichord, the vihuela's ideal venue is an intimate salon. It might just possibly be viable in a hall like Sherwood Auditorium. But in the spacious sanctuary of St. James — shaped like a lofty shoebox - its sound was so distant and feeble (even from close-up seats, like mine) that a listener required a constant, disciplined concentration of attention in order to keep his mind fixed on the music, an effort that rapidly became exhausting. This was particularly so since O'Dette played with all the delicate expressive devices he would have employed if performing in a little room. Often enough, a nuance such as the whispering, vanishing shake he liked to use on the final note of a reflective piece functioned for the eye rather than for the ear, which could scarcely differentiate it from silence.

In one of his engaging spoken comments, O'Dette remarked on the dark timbre of the vihuela, as opposed to the lute, and suggested that

it was that timbre that led the Spanish Renaissance composers to prefer the smaller instrument. In St. James, the dark quality pretty much eluded me. What I heard was a rather dry, gray, colorless sound, severe and faded, some-

thing like the atmosphere of a cloudy November day at the Escorial. O'Dette, of course, was correct about the vihuela's tim-

bre, but to perceive it you need to listen to up-close recordings of the instrument. Hopkinson Smith, for example, has recorded much of this repertoire on vihuela, and his fine Astrée CDs enable you to hear the special characteristics of sound O'Dette was referring to.

Smith's recordings might well convince you that the vihuela is not a somewhat inferior, provincial substitute for the lute but that it has its own real character, and that the Spanish composers, with their specific musical aims, preferred it for good reason. I do have to mention that the same music can also be played on the lute, where the performer — such as Konrad Ragossnig on his admirable four-disc survey of Renaissance lute music - can take advantage of the lute's richer resonance, more vivid presence, and greater variety of tone color. The composers themselves may not have wanted such "superfluous" benefits, but the music is certainly not harmed by them.

A second problem with this concert was the music itself. The chief exponents of the school were represented, all their music dating from the middle of the 16th Century: Luvs Milan, Luvs de Narvaez, and Alonso Mudarra. (There are several other notable vihuelists of the period, of whom I have a special fondness for Miguel de Fuenllana.) These are superb composers, each with his own distinctive style; but they are a bit niggardly in yielding up their richness to a casual listener. You cannot expect from them the gripping emotional profundity of a Denis Gaultier or the awesome, Bach-like architecture of a Sylvius Leopold Weiss, lutenist-composers of later centuries.

The art of Milan, Narvaez, and Mudarra is understated and exquisitely refined. Its virtuosity is restrained within an austere decorum. Its effects are of extreme subtlety. Breathe a bit too hard, and you've missed them - everything ex-

cept the good tunes. Not many of the pieces are as immediately accessible and ingratiating as Mudarra's famous "Ludovico's Harp" (Fantasia que contrahaze la harpa en la manera de Ludovico), which — in O'Dette's dazzling performance — so roused the audience's enthusiasm.

In his useful commentary on some of the other pieces, O'Dette attempted to alert the audience to what was going on musically, but he couldn't be at your ear all the way through, murmuring "Listen to how he cunningly changes the harmony here,' or "Listen to how this idea secretly suggests the next one.' The complexity of invention reaches its height in many of the works of Narvaez, whose style is largely an imitation of vocal polyphony — but it is a polyphony so bared to its essentials (as the instrument's limitations demand) that unless you know to listen for it, and have a trained sensitivity to its syntax, you may seem to be hearing little more than isolated plucked notes in a landscape apparently barren of feature or movement. If you did not already know this music well (listening to the CDs of Hopkinson Smith or Jacob Herringman over and over would do it), a miscellany of pieces in an overlarge hall, where often you could not be sure when one Fantasia was over and when the next one started, might not have been the ideal way to begin, however beautifully everything was played.

The second half of O'Dette's recital was considerably different. We were now close to two centuries further on in Spanish musical history, with the compositions of Santiago de Murcia (who flourished in the early part of the 18th Century). The instrument was the Baroque guitar. And the music was of a more popular stamp, taking its vitality and its ideas from dances and songs of the period, including the fandango, the canarios, the cumbées, and the tarantella. But while

> the change of pace was welcome, and the performances were sometimes pungent with the unmistakable flavor of Spanishness, here too I ultimately found myself wishing that O'Dette had chosen a different sort of program.

> O'Dette is a fan of Santiago de Murcia, as he made clear in his introduction to this part. He considers him the best composer for his instrument in his period in his country. I would not disagree with that assessment, but the fact is that

18th-century Spain is not rich in good composers for plucked string instruments. The golden age of the lute was rapidly passing away all over Europe. The great Spanish vihuelists belonged to a distant past. The last important publication of vihuela music (by Esteban Daza) had appeared more than a hundred years before de Murcia was born. The locus of significant instrumental composition "in the Spanish mode" had moved to the keyboard (Domenico Scarlatti and — later — Padre Antonio Soler). Whatever talent de Murcia possessed (and he was reputed to be a sensational performer), history had denied his instrument the supporting framework of a high musical culture.

Beyond these deficiencies in his historical environment, he strikes me as a relatively feeble composer, lacking the inventiveness and formal sense of his vihuelist predecessors, along with their uncanny ability to make a very small piece of music sound like a major musical statement. In contrast, a piece like de Murcia's variations on the lovely tune "Marizápolos" wanders along for what sounds like an infinite five minutes, and all the comeliness of O'Dette's perfor-

mance cannot get it to capture the listener's imagination for longer than a few seconds at a

time. Even de Murcia's skill in fashioning guitar transcriptions of the works of other composers - a skill O'Dette (who ought to know) praised highly — produced rather ineffectual achievements, if we are to judge by the transcribed movements from a Corelli violin sonata (Opus 5, No. 3) that O'Dette performed. Nor can the general mediocrity of the music during this part of the program be blamed on the performer. Richard Savino has recorded much of the same repertoire on his de Murcia CD; he, like O'Dette, plays the Baroque guitar with impressive mastery; both are intelligent and sensitive musicians; but neither can make Santiago de Murcia sound very interesting. O'Dette also labored under

the difficulty of performing this music all on his own. He himself has alluded to the problem in writing about de Murcia's numerous settings of the lively new dances that became popular in 18th-century Spain (many of them imported from Latin America, and some of them arriving — by way of Mexico — from West Africa). These settings "frequently begin with several variations of vigorous, rhythmic strumming, followed by very thin-textured punteado ["plucked"] passages. Played on one guitar, there is often a feeling of emptiness

upon reaching the plucked variations.²

In many of the pieces on his pleasant but slightly tedious CD of de Murcia's music, titled ;Jácaras!, O'Dette has filled that emptiness with the sounds of an ensemble. He shares the role of lead melody instrument with Andrew Lawrence-King, playing harp or psaltery; the always-splendid Pedro Estevan supplies catchy percussion rhythms; and two additional Baroque guitars fill in the texture. (Savino's CD, too, adds percussion.) Yet even with this idiomatic fueling, the music has a hard time catching fire. At their best, the performances sound like a slightly cautious and academic imitation of the real thing: the scintillating, impassioned experience you can get in any flamenco tablao in Córdoba today, with modern instruments, Spanish temperaments, and no worries about authentic performance practices.

And as to instruments: I'm afraid I can't find much good to say for the Baroque guitar, however well played. Aside from its historical authenticity, it seems inferior in every respect to its 20th-century descendants. Everything that is potentially good in de Murcia's music — and there are many good tunes and lots of vigorous strumming - would sound better on the modern guitar. But the modern guitar is not Paul O'Dette's instrument. His soul lies in the lute;



hen writing about The Taming of the Shrew, most Shakespeare scholars do avoidance behavior. They talk about the beauties of its form (such an advancement over The Comedy of Errors), its spicy

wit and language - about anything but the core of this cruel, sexist play in which Petruchio holds Kate hostage and deprograms her spirit. Some even

claim that Renaissance women had it worse than Kate (Anne Barton: "Petruchio, although no Romeo, is almost a model of intelligence and humanity"). Surely, they contend, our glorious Shakespeare couldn't have "meant" such abuse.

Why not? His own story is the opposite of Petruchio. He had no choice, had to get married: Anne Hathaway was 26, he 18 (in fact, his freespirited life took a shift as abrupt as Kate's). He'd leave his wife and children for long stretches of time to write wealthily in London. The facts suggest that the swaggering, control freak Petruchio could be the young Bard's alter ego.

Most stagings deny as well. Kate's infamous speech about a wife's duty to her husband — "such duty as the subject owes the prince" gets recited with knowing winks and nudgenudge asides to the audience, hinting that neither Shakespeare, nor the production, believes this mishmash. There have also been numerous cross-dressing productions (Olivier,



for example, played Kate as a youth), but these, too, underscore gender stereotypes.

Delicia Turner Sonnenberg, one of the area's most inventive young directors, who staged an all-female Othello not long ago, has a different take on Shrew: for Eveoke Dance

Theater, she sends the play

through a looking glass. Men play women and women play men, but the men play men playing women, and vice versa.

The concept requires an adjustment, because the flip-flop completely reverses power relations. Although they talk tough — Kate has a beard and does karate chops — men are sub-servient, second-class citizens in this "woman's world." Female dominance is in the air, taken for granted, just as Shakespeare's society assumed patriarchy fit the Great Chain of Being. Now women rule, and no more humanely than did the men, who are "chattel," mere economic "goods" to use, discard, and, should the whim strike their superiors, terrorize.

Everyone in the 14-person cast wears soft pink outfits. When not onstage, the actors form a chorus line against the rear wall, moving in unison and freezing in suggestive tableaux (some run into the wall and stick, like cooked pasta). Often movements are similar, as one actor shadows another. They perform on a bare thrust stage, save for two benches that recon-


figure into seats and walls. In effect, the production's spare look eliminates visual details. It's a different, "pink" world. Petruchio is still in charge, only he's a tall blonde, as expressive of her sexuality as he "was" with his.

The choice makes for eerie moments. At one

point David Stinnett, the guy-playing-the-guyplaying Bianca, takes off his sleeveless T-shirt. First thought: the dimwitted Bianca wouldn't do that. Second (from a limbo between the original text and the new concept): but she's not...she's really a he, so it's...okay?


Third thought: Eveoke's staging doesn't break down barriers so much as expose them. Looked at inside out, Shrew brims with unwritten status codes and power relations: how many times do the women — or in this case, the men - defer? Know their place? The play depicts a cultural form, a feudal mentality: one is either a master or a servant. In this anything-butdemocratic world, those who don't fit, like Kate, get edited until they do.

Much of the show's vigor comes from its host of Kates. Because it's now their world, every actress gets to play her: in charge, uncorseted, without taboos or censorship. They strut. And the males act boxed in, objectified, smaller than life. Liv Kellgren's takecharge Petruchio knows no boundaries. Kate (a game Tim Wild) throws karate chops that never reach a target.

The production makes up in energy what it often lacks in verbal skill, however. Some in the cast weren't ready for Shakespeare. Those who were — Jo Anne Glover, Patricia Elmore Costa, M. Susan Peck, and the amazing Don Loper as a hermaphroditic Grumio — magnify the inabilities of those who weren't. The group tends toward the shrill. And the higher the voices get, the more the strange acoustics of the space swallow words whole, as if the ceiling is an immense vacuum cleaner.

An ongoing plus: the show is also a dance. Gina Angelique's choreography keeps the stage alive, as the chorus floods in from the rear wall or performers slapstick effects. All relish their expressive physi-cality—especially the women, now "free," move with natural exuberance. The evening opens with a male-female dance duet. Elizabeth Marks and Anthony Rodriguez perform a kind of jokey, happy wrestling that devolves into epic WWF shenanigans: the story of the play in miniature. And the evening concludes with a haunting solo. Under blue light, the dancer hides his face under white, wedding-like veils. When he moves, he looks like a lion made of smoke.

Bertolt Brecht had a slogan: "Shakespeare changes, only if we can change Shakespeare." But we can't, not if we read the original texts. For all his lightning-bolt insights into human nature and empyrean skill with language, in many ways the Bard was as local — limited to a specific time and region - as universal. We in turn "localize" his works by cutting them, erasing the anti-Semitism, softening the Tory rage for order, and shaping them to our world view. We do it so much, and have become so familiar with the results, that the plays' actual content often comes as a surprise, even a shock. It takes an approach like Eveoke's to make the shock real.

Those tall cans of AquaNet spray are back in the spotlight. As are the gigantic domes of hair, worn by the

"Hives," in the Theatre in Old Town's reprise of its 1992 hit show. Beehive celebrates the women singers and "girl groups" of the 1960s. But if you caught only the first half hour, you'd swear some thing's amiss. The six talented performers parody every song and vocalist. As in melodrama they exaggerate gestures and tones, from Lesley Gore to the Supremes (who break up before our eyes) and Patti LaBelle (who, when she sold her heart to the "Junkman," was far more serious than this!). Directed by Paula Kalustian, the production abandons its aura of overkill-silly as the '60s lose innocence. And the second half includes first-rate solos: especially Renae Mitchell as Aretha Franklin, Lisa Payton-Davis as Tina Turner, and Joy Yandell as Janis Joplin. The show captures some of the texture of the era.

Iill K. Mesaros's costumes are a history lesson (the times weren't the only thing "a-changin' " back then; styles made 180-degree turns about every three years). Jasper Grant's four-piece band keeps the evening cruising. To the young, however, Nick Reid's set may require an explanation. What are those big black round thingies all over the place? Phonograph records. The ones with big holes in the center were 45s. And for the generation of the '60s, they were minted currency. Worth a try.

A Knife in the Heart

Susan Yankowitz's drama studies the effects of a John Hinkley-like assassin on his mother. Donald Holt, premeditated, stabbed and killed the governor and three others and paralyzed a young girl. The play, and a fine Sledgehammer production, probe Mrs. Holt's pain. How does it feel to be the mother of an assassin? Thanks to a moving performance by Rosina Revnolds, the answer is: a living hell, where "every memory is changed by what has happened." Mrs. Holt moves through thickets of second-guessing (where did she — or did she — go wrong?) and gauntlets of blame. Imagine Medea's mother. Reynolds's performance is so compelling one can almost overlook how the writing slants in Mrs. Holt's favor. The play is far more concerned with not blaming her than with what made the kid go off. She asks many questions but avoids the ones that might reveal complicity. And at times she's so self-centered you want to shout, "It always has to be about you!" Studies show that assassins, spree, and serial killers don't spring full-blown from Zeus's thigh. But Knife offers superficial motives and panders to the denial-laden stereotype that no one saw the violence coming. The



The Mystery of Irma Vep

Charles Ludlam wrote a funny homage to things dark and stormy — werewolves, mummies, bumps in the night — for two actors. At Diversionary Theatre, David McBean and Farhang Pernoon excel in multiple roles, including Lord Edgar and Lady Enid Hillcrest. They perform in a stylistic homage to 19th-century acting (their characters are serious; they just express themselves ornately). Part of the fun, along with trying to follow Ludlam's circumlocutory plot, comes from watching McBean and Pernoon drift offstage, as one person, then roar back, in seconds, as another — often a different gender, usually a different emotional state (the actors' backstage schizophrenia must verge on hallof-mirrors proportions). Aided by three dressers, they make the changes so crisply the show never wanes. Credit for the pace, and much else, including Ludlam's rich ear for allusions (which range from Francois Villon to B movies) must go to director James Saba, whose deft touch shows that, along with being one of San Diego's better actors, he's found a second, much-needed calling. All the designers contribute: David Weiner's woodpaneled set, Shulamit Nelson's H. Ryder Haggard costumes, Chris Rynne's spooky lighting, and, especially George Ye's sounds, be they rhapsodic 1940s Hollywood violins or fright-flick mood music, which often intrudes like a third actor onstage

ComedySportz changed its name, but its methods (and madness) remain the same. Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terri-ble Turks mangled defrocked Priests, while mums and dads yelled insults and grannies waved their handbags"). National Com-

edy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic di rector Gary Kramer says the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a "challenge match" against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit, rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledged fail-ure, abundantly, then forgot it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian.

Worth a try.



"If we used Tix.com,

the charge was \$1.25 per ticket. If we used Ticketmaster...they would have made about \$10 per ticket. We went with Tix.com," said Trish Fisher, publicity director for the Associated Students of Grossmont College.

Last Friday the students staged their first major music event at the school's west soccer field. Tickets to see headliner Rocket from the Crypt and eight other bands went for \$14.75.

Many lament Ticketmaster's virtual monopoly over concert ticket distribution. Last Friday's show at Grossmont College marked the first time Long Beach–based Tix.com had been used for a San Diego pop music event.

"The cost of providing ticketing services has plummeted, yet at the same time, service fees have skyrocketed," said Tix.com president Robert Edmison. "In the '70s and '80s you had

to go to your local record store to purchase tickets. The cost of the network and computer systems was very high. Yet the service fees were only \$2.50 per ticket. Now you only need the Internet."

So why does Ticketmaster get away with charging 30 to 40 percent extra for tickethandling fees?

"You'll need to ask them about that," said Edmison.

Tix.com is set up to send tickets through the mail or have them available at will call on the day of show. Unlike Ticketmaster, Tix.com does not maintain outlets at Robinsons-May or other locations.

Grossmont College student Fisher outlined what Ticketmaster wanted to charge the school and the ticket buyers for last Friday's show.

"First they wanted a \$750 setup fee from us. On top of that they wanted four percent of our ticket price. Then they tack on a \$4 convenience fee and a \$3.05 processing fee." Tix.com's Edmison said

those who attended last

Friday's show only paid an extra \$1.25 service charge on the day of show, or \$1.75 if they purchased tickets online. Eddia Vaddar was the last

Eddie Vedder was the last major artist to challenge Ticketmaster's dominance. He mandated that tickets to Pearl Jam's 1999 tour be sold through Orange County–based ETM. That company folded two years ago. Supermarket kiosks were a key part of ETM's distribution.

Edmison said Tix.com's only other local clients are the San Diego Ballet and the San Diego Asian Film Festival, but there are 94 organizations using Tix.com nationwide.

One local concert industry exec admitted Ticketmaster fees were "very expensive," but he added, "Ticketmaster has the best infrastructure and software. They are the only ones who could handle large concerts." "Times have changed,"

said Edmison. Ticketmaster, which sold 86.7 million tickets last year, maintains its control because of exclusive contracts with venues like Coors Amphitheater and the Cox

Arena. On November 10, a Seattle Times columnist noted that when a Google search of the words "hate" and "Ticketmaster" were run, there were 16,300 results. "We provide our mousetrap and he provides

FM 94/9's commitment to local music is clear: the station plays music by local artists like Pinback, Boxcar Racer, Jason Mraz, Rocket from the Crypt, and Steve Poltz. Plus, he says there will be a weekend show dedicated to local bands.

"And our local music show is not going to run at 2 in the morning. Isn't that when 91X runs theirs?" *Loudspeaker* runs

midnight to 2 a.m. Tuesday on 91X. Goodin said that the 94/9 show will run at a "prominent time when people actually listen to the radio." "This radio station already sounds more local than they do," explains Michaels, 37. "They sound pretty cookie cutter to me. That's a trademark of Clear Channel."

Clear Channel programming vice president Jim Richards welcomes the debate over who's more local.

"[Program director] Bryan Shock has been here since 1969. [DJ] Chris Muckley is a San Diego native, and [general manager] Mike Glickenhaus has been here so long he might as well be a native.... What do they say? If you've been in San Trade Organization], and WTO members have no accountability to any treaties or standards. They can buy, sell, or produce anything they want. They have violated trade treaties in Guatemala, and they make no commitment to serving organic crops."

Greenslate, 22, has spent the past two years at San Francisco State University. He graduates next month with a degree in English literature and an appreciation of Bay Area political activism. "San Diego is a military town. San Francisco is a





"Boycotts only go so far," says Christopher Greenslate, lead singer of the Cause, of Starbucks' global irresponsibility. "Starbucks is part of the WTO [World melting pot for nonnatives. It is a lot more politically conscious." Greenslate says that in San Francisco there are two volunteer collective spaces for rockers — Mission Records and 924 Gilman Street. They are both nonprofit, all-age spaces to promote music. "Down in

San Diego we only have [UCSD's] Ché Café.'

As to the Cause, "We have had 14 member changes since we started in 1998." Perhaps it's because the requirements are ideological as well as musical. "We make sure our band merchandise is made in the U.S. We no longer support Fruit of the Loom [for T-shirts] or any other company that uses sweatshops in other countries.

I note that the Cause reminds me of Rage Against the Machine, the socialist band from Orange County.

"Except we were never signed to a major label, and we would never be signed to Epic like Rage was." He goes on to tell me that Rage's parent company owns weapons-manufacturing plants — he doesn't tell me how he knows this - and that "every time you buy a Rage record, you give George Bush about \$2 to buy weapons."


As for other local bands who have made it, Greenslate says, "I used to see blink at

the side stage at SOMA when I was 14. As I grew up, I started noticing I didn't agree with the blatant sexism in the [punk show] atmosphere where you try and get as many bras thrown onstage as possible. I don't think that's what punk rock is about. That hurts the integrity of the genre as a whole."

Greenslate says there are other progressive punk rock bands in San Diego, including Spare Change, An Arrow in Flight, and Violent Scene from a Film.

Greenslate said the worst thing about blink's success is that punk bands are now thinking more about selfpromotion than purpose. Bands have learned to sell and hype themselves before they learned to be a band and get a vision. Hardcore bands of San Diego need to concentrate on playing and forming relationships with people who are open to expressing ideas that set them apart from the mainstream.'

He hopes other bands will step up to play more fundraisers like the Stand Up for Kids benefit, Friday, November 29, at the Epicentre from 7 p.m. to 11:30 p.m., which will benefit homeless San Diego youth. Featured artists include PBR, Spare Change, the

rowdy hole in the wall is pure fun...about as big as a walk-in closet and has very scary bathrooms. None of the pictures in the galleries have explanatory captions, so I'm mystified as to why "OB House Party" has a full-grown man trying to

crawl into a toddler's Big Wheel. Also, who is the guy using a traffic cone as a bullhorn outside of PB's Typhoon Saloon? ("One of the greatest meat markets in town.")



was at Off the Record in Hillcrest, the place where every vinyl junkie south of Lou's Records goes. I saw ten photos of Henry Diltz's on the wall — signed. Diltz has photographed over 200 album and CD covers,

including such artists as Jackson Browne, Dan Fogelberg, James Taylor, Buffalo Springfield, the Doors, Joni Mitchell, and the first three Eagles records.

I asked owner Rich Horowitz how they got his photos, and he explained, "His people knew we had worked with Yoko Ono for 13 years with the John Lennon lithographs, and so we got involved in his slide shows and galleries that go across the country."

Horowitz, who's owned Off the Record since 1978, says people can come in and see the photos and even order signed limited-edition prints.

I talked with Diltz by phone a few months ago (he was in Chicago) about some of his famous subjects. He says when he had to photograph Richard Pryor, "We went over to his house. His wife said, 'Well, he's sleeping, and he won't get up. You try to get him up.' He was in bed and said, 'Just take the picture of me in bed.' It was his first album, and we wanted to do something better, and Pryor said, 'Well, I wouldn't mind doing something rootsy.' We went to an antique shop and got some aborigine weapons and jewelry, and Richard knew of



this cave nearby in Beverly Hills. He put a ring in his nose, took all his clothes off, got a bow and arrow. We even built a campfire. When we looked at the slides, my business partner Gary Burden thought it would be neat to make it look

IEW ARD Nard to change the cover so it wouldn't look as much like the magazine."

"Speaking of people threatening to sue, when you took the cover photo of the Doors' *Morrison Hotel*, the desk clerk said you couldn't. When he went upstairs, you had the band run in, and you took the photos. How did you end up getting permission?"

Diltz said, "The record company lawyers asked if they [the Doors] had permission, and they just wrote them a letter and paid them some small amount. But, that's the one album cover that when kids find out I took [the photo] seem to really be impressed by."

Crosby, Stills, Nash, and Young reunited and played at the Sports Arena on March 27 of this year. Diltz took their first album cover, and the first before Neil Young joined, and still takes photos for them. He said, "They hadn't settled on a name yet. They needed some photos, and we were driving around Hollywood, and Graham Nash had seen this little house that actually



had a couch out front. They sat down on it, and we started shooting pictures. A few days later, they decided they'd call themselves 'Crosby, Stills, and Nash,' but we were disappointed to see one of the photos we liked was backwards. It was Nash, Stills, and Crosby. I told the guys that would be confusing, because on the album, it would say 'Crosby' over the picture of Nash. I talked them into going back the next day. We did, and it was gone. The couch wasn't there, and the house had been bulldozed. So, they went with the photo anyway."

As for Woodstock, "I lived a few miles from

Woodstock and didn't realize it would be that big an event.... Cars had parked on both sides of the road, and I couldn't even drive my car down this dirt road. I ended up sleeping in my car backstage on Thursday. Days before the concert, people started showing. It wasn't until the first day, when somebody brought an aerial photograph, that we realized so many people were there."

I told Diltz, "I have seen some photos you did of Nirvana, and I know that you say your favorite thing is to sit and shoot James Taylor or Joni Mitchell and listen to them play for

hours. But, when grunge came out, or punk in the '70s, did it make it less enjoyable to photograph if you didn't dig the music?'

Henry laughs and says, "I prefer music with a melody and a harmony. Uplifting, beautiful music. With punk and grunge, it was more about the scene. You didn't leave one of those concerts humming a melody. It was about the excitement of the event. I worked, in the '80s, for Capitol Records. I would shoot parties, concerts, whatever. There was a lot of heavy metal at that time I shot. WASP, Anthrax, and Poison. Shooting videos was fun, because it wasn't just all music. But I remember this industrial band called Skinny Puppy. It was just noise. I remember trying to walk into the back of the auditorium and just being blown out of there, it was so loud."

I asked Henry how many covers he has photographed, and he said, "I stopped counting after 200. And companies like Rhino will call, because they're doing a 'Best of,' and they'll want an old picture I've done for an album cover.... I've done some newer ones for a new kid named Ryan Green

who's a singer-songwriter, Stephen Bishop, and I did two covers for Steve Poltz." I asked Poltz what it was like working with Diltz, and

wrote the hits "Up, Up, and Away," "MacArthur Park," and "By the Time I Get to Phoenix." Diltz said, "Jimmy was into

he said, "His use of light is great. And he'll tell stories and have you laughing. You forget he's even taking pictures, and the next thing you know, he's done....He and his partner Gary and I were driving into Mexico. We actually got pulled over going in, and thoroughly searched, because of over 55, with long ponytails. He's a great photographer. A national treasure.'

I asked Diltz, "Who decided it would be a good idea for you to get into a glider with Jimmy Webb?"

Webb is the only guy to win a Grammy for music, lyrics, and orchestration. He gliders, and it was out in the desert. He needed an album cover, and I went up there with him several times taking photos. Sometimes I'd get him, the wing, and the ground below. We got a great cover out of it.... We went way up high in the mountains, and they were covered with snow. We got into this down draft, and we just starting going down. I knew we were going to get low, to get some shots. But we couldn't make it over, and his instructor said if you're going to crash into trees, it's best to hit two trees going between them, so the wings are taken off. One wing hit will just spin you around. So, he aimed for



the trees. We got knocked unconscious, and the helicopter pilot that rescued us said we were the first live bodies he had ever pulled out of there." I asked Jimmy Webb about

the story. (I e-mailed Jimmy Webb's website and kept bugging his people for quotes. They finally called and told me, if I made it quick, I could speak with Webb briefly.)

Webb told me, "Being forced to crash land a small aircraft, I could be no more fortunate than to be accompanied by Henry. When our situation had deteriorated to the extent that I was compelled to dryly mutter in my best Chuck Yeager imitation, 'We're going down,' Henry asked calmly, 'Down where?' The trees and peaks were coming up quickly, and he said 'Oh' and just busily began

photographing the treacherous landscape.... When we regained consciousness, the first thing I saw was movie film hanging from the pine trees in great loops like bizarre Christmas decorations. Henry was just pissed that the film didn't come out."

Webb told about a time that Diltz "had me climb up into some trees wearing this kind of a monk outfit.... I used to say, 'Just let me stand here, for God's sake ' One time we moved the nine-foot concert grand out into the front yard and shot it outside under the trees.

I asked Webb how Diltz gets people to so easily give in and move pianos and climb

manner that comes along with Henry that makes him more than just a good photographer.'

I went to a slide show Diltz did in Del Mar two years ago. I brought some of the albums I had that he had shot. When he saw the Eagles, he commented that it didn't fold out to show the inside picture. Another one, a Steppenwolf album, used his photo for the cover originally, but on reissues, the label just used his partner Gary's artwork. I asked him about record companies changing the way they want an album to look.

"Those record companies try to save a few pennies here and there. I remember when the Eagles' On the Border came out with the drawing on the cover. I had taken an amazing shot of them at the desert, and it was a double foldout paper that was twice the size of an album. It was an insert in the album, and I was in England in the early '70s. Somebody walked in with that album, and I wanted to see it. I looked at the back and saw it said, 'Photography by Henry Diltz." I pulled out the inside — and just the record in a plain sleeve. David Geffen had saved a few cents an album by not putting it in there. He figured it wouldn't help sell any more albums, because you don't even see it in there. He did that without telling anybody. But, Geffen is a millionaire. Guess how?" ■





Speak Art

had a note from the poet Michael O'Brien in New York recently. Like a number of poets, his letters sometimes rival his poetry. I had recommended to him, as I had to you, Krystian Zimerman's recording of Debussy's Preludes.

O'Brien relates this experience involving the music of Debussy. (The Camarge Foundation is an artist's retreat in France. For some reason I place it in the south, near Marseilles, but I could be wrong.)

Debussy: There were some concerts at the Camarge Foundation in Cassis when we were there, one of them a kind of concert/reading, given by two friends, a pianist and a poet. They took turns: the poet would read some of his poems - quiet, gentle, Eluard-like; the pianist would play some Debussy. God knows why they thought it was a good idea. For the poet, it was suicidal. His poems, all recent, seemed

slight, old-hat, period work; the Debussys, at least 70 years old, seemed astonishingly of the moment, ab-solutely fresh, new-minted. Full of power. They just steam-rolled the poems. Going up against a piano is bad enough; but going up against Debussy? You think it's made of lace until it blindsides you. Like women

Indeed. Well, the relationship of music and poetry, a not always easy one as O'Brien points out, is an an-

cient one. Way back when, they were joined at the hip, often with dance. Who was it that said music and poetry are the twin handmaidens of dance? No matter. The relationship was sundered, at least in England, during the 17th Century. I am not here speaking of the lieder or aria, songs with lyrics, often beautiful. I'm speaking of poetry, which in conception is inseparable from musical accompaniment, like so much of shorter Elizabethan poetry, with its stresses and vowel lengths, long and short, arranged to suit a prospective musical setting. Poets then were often musicians, probably lutenists. Songlike poetry never entirely disappeared, it

atrophied. Certainly most modern composers have at one time or another composed for voice or voice and instruments. Often the piece involves independently written texts of poetry that the composer sets (as a jeweler sets a precious stone) to music. But this is something different from Thomas Campion and Elizabethan notions of the lyric.

At any rate, poets and musicians have, for nearly four centuries, been attempting to get poetry and music back together again in joyful harness. The results have been mixed. One of the more intrigu-

ing recent nuptials has involved poetry and jazz. By way of getting to poetry and jazz,

allow me to detour and briefly discuss recorded poetry. Jazz recordings have been a commonplace for some 80 years, but "spoken arts" recordings (though 19th-century examples ex-

ist by poets like Whitman and Tennyson) are not such a commonplace. Not least because they are routinely dreadful, the material boringly delivered, more often than not in a

The spoken-word category is fairly broad, and if you go down to the record

are likely to encounter comedy, famous speeches by political and social luminaries, inspirational talks, often rendered with cornball musical backgrounds, some literary recordings. Of course, these last 15 or 20 years there's been an explosion of the books-on-tape phenomenon. Mostly these recordings are unsatisfying or just flat awful since the books were made to be read silently and/or you've got some superannuated method actor emoting like

all get out. Sometimes they're quite good. I grew up listening to the Caedmon recordings in school. These included drama, Shakespeare mainly, and the traditional poets, these belonging to the canon of English poetry - Shakespeare, Milton, Pope, Wordsworth, etc. - being read by English stage actors. The result was usually awful: richly syllabled extravaganzas of elocution, avalanches of labials, plosives, and alveolars burying the poetry alive. But some of the recordings, the pairings of poet and performer, were marvelous: James Mason, for instance, reading Robert Browning's

Andrea Del Barto," or Richard Burton reading the love poems of John Donne, to name only two. Then there were the curiosities, like Orson Welles's take on Whitman's Leaves of Grass.

Caedmon also produced recordings of "contemporary" poets, figures like Ezra Pound, T.S. Eliot, W.C. Williams, W.H. Auden, Robert Graves, and the next generation: writers such as Ted Hughes, Thom Gunn, Robert Lowell, Sylvia Plath, Philip

Larkin, all of the above reading from their own work. Some read well, some indifferently, and some were dreadful, cruelly undermining their achievement. William Carlos Williams springs immediately to mind with his high-pitched, nasal delivery. Though unpracticed in how best to project, enunciate, pace, etc., the poets reading their own work were usually more palatable than the professional actors. Several,

however, like Ezra Pound, had cultivated excruciating mannerisms that they thought to be poetic. Pound is an extreme example, but most contemporary poets had mannerisms of some sort that they hoped would identify them as poetic.

The public poetry reading as we know it today only really came into existence here in America in the 1950s, its popularity initiated by Dylan Thomas, a practiced performer of his own work and those of certain eminent predecessors. Thomas had a radio show in Britain that enjoyed



of scores of poets from the Center. San Francisco and the West Coast were to be-

come the cradle of poetry readings in the U.S. There was the Poetry Center, of course. UC Berkeley not long after began inviting poets to read their work. But it was two other poetry-performance phenomena that really captured the nation's attention, both centered in San Francisco: the so-called Beat movement, centered around writer-personalities like Ginsberg, Kerouac, Corso, Ferlinghetti, and others, along with the phenomenon of poetry read to live jazz, whose celebrated, pioneering champion was the brilliant man of letters and self-promoter Kenneth Rexroth. Next week, on to "sexy Rex." ■

Folk music needs an Eminem of its own. He's a bona fide crossover star who has galvanized people who don't listen to rap to line up at the box office for the film *8 Mile*. When reading most folk press, one senses that the entire body of folk music urgently wants off the backseat it's been on for the past couple of decades, hence the unfortunate hyperbole that surrounds any folk artist in possession of reasonable chops.

Kate MacLeod has received such treatment. MacLeod's lyrics have been compared with John Steinbeck and Woody Guthrie, and one writer said she sounds like Nanci Griffith or Natalie Merchant. She does not. All that aside, what Kate MacLeod does have is a sweet voice that can also lie out like a sliver of ice. It's one of those kinds of

front porches, rocking chairs, wood smoke, and kitchen whiskey — all the good folk traditions. She also knows many ways to make a guitar sound good, even though she claims violin as her main

voices impossible to pinpoint as it floats out of the

speakers, ethereal and all

over the room. Straightfor-

ward, almost plain, MacLeod

sings in a voice redolent of

claims violin as her main weapon. MacLeod came to music as a child on that instrument; she eventually played fiddle in bluegrass and folk groups and dabbled in songwriting before mov-

ing to Utah to study violin making. There, she lived in a renovated railroad barracks with no heat or plumbing. She gigged in Celtic and bluegrass groups on fiddle and worked part-time in architecture. Songwriting resumed after she had children. She stayed home with her babies and kept her instruments safe from harm by storing them in the playpen while the kids had the run of the house.

Will MacLeod be big, as predicted by *The Folk Essential Album Guide* in '98? Probably not. Then again, maybe hip-hop is the new folk, and all that porch music from the past should have been put in the ground with Woody Guthrie.

Gobbling on T-Day

Dropping the turkey was nothing — hey, I'd already watched Julia Child do it on TV. But I should have paid more attention to her technique: When Julia did it, she didn't tip the panful of hot grease onto the floor as well. Another warm November, my buddy Irish Sam decided to grill the bird outdoors on a Weber. After a few hours on the hot-burning mesquite, the skin came out crisp, very crisp. So did the rest of the critter. But really, my most unforgettable Thanksgiving was the year my "brown-bag turkey" burst into flames, and my Significant Other sprayed the entire contents of the kitchen fire extinguisher into the oven. Tiny bubbles, anyone?

Little mishaps such as that are the reason why many people prefer to eat Thanksgiving at restaurants, or at least get take-out birds.

For takeout, if you want something more interesting than a supermarket ready-roasted turkey, you can pick up a well-smoked bird at Big Jim's (see North Coast, below) or at Barnes BBQ, 2625 Lemon Grove Avenue (at Cypress, tucked in the back of Liquor Mart Square), Lemon Grove, 619-462-9206. Ĉall ahead (Î mean now!) to order. Barnes's birds are \$1.25 per pound, and they're also fixing yams, greens, pie...all those goodies. Alternatively, there's that Cajun treat you never want to try at home, kids (unless you're very, very brave and not a gobbler-dropping klutz) — deep-fried Big Bird. That, too, can be purchased from Big Jim's or from Mardi Gras Cafe, 3185 Midway Drive (near Rosecrans), Loma Portal, 619-223-550. Mardi Gras' price is \$4.25 per pound. The latter's regular menu of N'awlins specialties is available as well, but you'll have to make your own gravy for the gobbler. Call ahead there too.

As for restaurant reservations, best thing is to call and reserve *this very day*, this minute. Some of the choicest destinations are full-up already; some were even full by November 1. If reserving for the higher-end places, have your credit card ready; they'll want the number, and if you're a noshow, they may charge you for the dinner you missed.

Restaurants serving Thanksgiving dinners are listed geographically below, so you can find one nearby and avoid excessive driving under the influence of turkey. And if you're thinking ahead to Christmas dinner out, save the list — restau-



Strange Appetizers

"Guanabana, curuba, mamey, borojo — what the heck fruit are they?"

ank and I are in love. With Dayami. Sigh. She came, she left. Now we sit here like a couple of stunned oxen. Can hardly remem-

ber the meal we've just eaten. Oh, yes. I was in the middle of my aphrodisiac

bistec encebollado when she appeared at the door.

"Man," said Hank. He held his fork above his plate of *pastel y arroz con gandules* and looked. She came past us and went up to Eric, the Tropical Star's owner, at the counter. Asked for a Cuban sandwich.

She seemed to know the place well. She told us she was Cuban, she told us about Havana, she told us about the *son de la loma* music she sings. And how this was one of only two places in San Diego she knows where Cubans and Venezuelans and Argentines and other South Americans can come for a bit of home food and atmosphere.

Actually, Eric and his wife Amanda, who run the place, are Puerto Rican, but they cook dishes from all over the Caribbean and Central and South America. Tropical Star's a store as much as a restaurant. Lots of Puerto Rican and other flags hang along the walls. Sixteen decorated clocks tick beside them. Shelves are stocked with everything from *yerba maté*, the tea Argentines and other Latin Americans love, to *terma*, a bitter herb-based cocktail people drink to sharpen



their appetites. Then, along the floor, big boxes hold giant green avocados and roots with names like *malanga* and *ñame* (say "nyaamey").

"This really is different, man," Hank had said as we sat down at one of the half-dozen Formica tables. "I mean, look at the menu, the fruit juices on the back. *Guanabana, curuba,*

mamey, borojo — what the heck fruit are they?"

Eric couldn't explain either when I went up to order a *curuba* for me and a *borojo* for Hank (\$2.75 each). "*Curuba* is...*curuba*," he said.

They're like milk shakes. And they are fruit with milk, basically. Mine tasted a bit like tamarind mixed with kiwifruit. Hank said his was like no fruit he'd ever eaten.

Then there were a whole bunch of strange appetizers to pick from: *alcapurria*, a "tasty croquette made of grated green bananas, filled with seasoned beef." From Puerto Rico, \$2.00. Or *bigoron*, a Nicaraguan specialty. "Boiled yucca root served with pork rind topped with fresh vegetables and garnished with an optional spicy vinaigrette, \$3.95."

The main-dish combos cost between \$5.50 and \$11.00. Yes, there were a couple of familiar ones, like *arroz con pollo*, chicken with rice (\$5.50), or *ropa vieja*, the Cuban-style shredded beef (\$7.95), but most of the rest were new. *Tamal Colombiano*, a "savory mixture of pork, chicken, and vegetables in a cornmeal base, and cooked inside a wrapping of banana leaves." Comes with rice and salad, \$6.50. Or *lomo saltado*, "Peruvian beef delight. Sliced steak sautéed with fresh tomatoes, onions, cilantro and French fries." Served with white rice, \$7.50.

"French fries and rice? That's new," said Hank. So we went for a couple of appetizers — *empanadas* (\$2.00) and *relleno de yuca* (\$1.75). For entrées, Hank wanted the *pastel y arroz con gandules* ("cake" and rice with pigeon peas, \$6.50). It's a Puerto Rican tamale also made of grated green bananas boiled with spicy pork in a banana leaf, with yellow rice and pigeon peas and salad.

I was going to have the Brazilian red snapper with white rice and black beans (*filete de pescado Paulista*), \$6.95. But as I stood at the counter waiting to give my order, this family of Colombians came up to pay. Steve, the son, who's going to college here, said no, I should have number 9. The *bistec encebollado*. That's basically slices of beef with lots of sautéed onions and tomatoes and garlic, with white rice and red beans (\$6.95). "Why?"

"Because Colombians always say if you are going to make love, you should have that dish first. It gives you...strength," he said. The kid's only what? Sixteen, seventeen? He laughs. "That's what we believe." Naturally I changed. Had to see what the deal was.

'Course by the time Eric brought it all to the table, I realized we'd overdone this. For starters, the Colombian *empanadas*, basically potato and beef in a cornmeal jacket, were pretty filling in themselves. We dipped them in an *aji* sauce (tomatoes, cilantro, peppers), and they were scrumbo. Delish.

Same with the yucca root stuffed with pork and beef. Crisp on the outside, soft inside.

I was just plowing into the beef and onions when Dayami came. She sat down for a moment as she waited for her Cuban sandwich. "Oh, yes," she said when I asked about the Colombian's story. "It's the onions and garlic that do it. We believe that in Cuba too."

Then Eric brought her sandwich (with slices of roast pork, ham, and cheese, mustard and pickles, on baguette bread, "pressed hot" in the Cuban way), \$4.95, and she shook our hands and left.

Sigh. That was ten minutes ago. I scan the menu, on auto.

"Feel like a *morir sonando*?" I ask. "It's O.J., milk, and sugar, \$2.75."

"Yeah, but what does the name mean?" Hank says.



"It's pretty cheap landscaping, when you figure it."

he wine business is a seductive one: farming with a pedigree; getting back to the earth with style. What's more, it's common to hear of a kind of community life among winemakers, people always willing to lend a hand or offer ad-

vice, giving rise to the idea that wine is a lifestyle business. All of it proved seductive enough to ensnare Ramona insurance agent Bill Jenkin, a man who doesn't drink.

Jenkin began visiting local wineries with his girlfriend in 1998. Once there, "I was intrigued by the looks of the vines and the romance involved that two of the

romance involved, that type of thing. I was looking for something to do with my land; I've got six acres, and I was just trying to use up the acreage. I started talking to some people at the wineries about growing grapes, and that's how I found out about the grape-growing seminar."

Jenkin attended the seminar, which was put on by the San Diego County Vintner's Association, in May of 1999. A year later, he put in his first vines: a little under two acres of Syrah. "There wasn't very much Syrah planted in the area, and I had heard it was a vigorous vine." He also planted a seven-grape test vineyard, one that included Zinfandel, Cabernet, and Muscat Canelli. "I was interested in finding out what varietal would grow best here — it seems like a lot of the wineries will point you in the direction of the varietal that they need."

The tactic was hardly surprising; a lot of the seminar attendees — Jenkin included — were planting grapes with the hope of selling them to local wineries, so it followed that the wineries would push for the sort of fruit they were interested in buying. Jenkin knew he wasn't going to make money on his investment anytime soon. Planting vines can cost "\$15,000 an acre if you do it right. Then you sell your grapes for \$800 a ton, and you're only getting two or three tons per year [off a given acre]. It's pretty cheap landscaping,



when you figure it. It just doesn't pan out, except for the tax write-offs."

And to make matters worse, it began to look as if some of the wineries might not be so interested in buying. Some of the members of the San

Diego County Vintner's Association "were buying all their grapes from Mexican wineries. There was some resentment built up; why should we patronize their seminars and make them money when they're not buying our product? I mean, everybody understands why they're doing it — they can buy

the grapes cheaper in Mexico, and the quality is up there." For example, Camillo Magoni, a winemaker who sells Mexican fruit to a number of local wineries, has access to established vineyards with a history of success. "So," grants Jenkin, "there's no reason business-wise for them not to do it." Still, some growers regarded it as "sort of a slap in the face."

Jenkin, still in the thrall of the wine bug, considered opening a small tasting room next to his insurance office in Ramona's old downtown. But he found he wasn't able to do that "unless I was associated with another winery. I was hoping I could get somebody to use the spot as an outside extension, like Witch Creek has in Julian, and then work under their license. But nobody wanted to assume the responsibility of another tasting room. I thought I was dead in the water."

Then came January 2002 and the Board of Supervisors' decision to amend the zoning ordinance to allow wholesale wineries to operate on agricultural land — land like his six-acre parcel. Jenkin began to see a possible solution to his woes. He had noticed four or five other Ramona residents at that first grape-growing seminar and had struck up conversations with them. He met Ramona-based members of the San Diego Amateur Winemakers' Association, several of whom grew their own grapes. By January of this year, his circle of neigh-

boring growers had expanded to eight or nine. He started calling around, and by the time the Ramona Vintner's Association held its first meeting, there were 11 members.

The association's primary purpose was to provide "an FYI meeting to grow good grapes." As is usual with such associations, speakers would be brought in, and people would have a chance to share information. But Jenkin had another idea as well. "One of the main reasons I started this vineyard association was to get a co-op winery going. What I wanted out of the vineyard association was to have a pool of resources," Ramona grapes that could be turned into Ramona wine, with Ramona investors to help get the thing off the ground.

Jenkin, who sits on the board of directors of the Ramona Chamber of Commerce, began buying and pouring San Diego wines at community mixers. Local interest began to percolate. The Chamber of Commerce saw the plan as a way to make Ramona a destination. Local farmers pricked up their ears when the talk turned to water. "With this three-year drought, there's not much water in Ramona. The avocado growers are spending a ton of money on water, and they're letting some of their growth go. Recently, there's been a whole lot of interest from the avocado growers to start growing grapes; I saw four or five of them at our last meeting. Grapevines take an average of 6 gallons of water per plant per week, while an avocado will take 30 gallons."

At home, Jenkin's neighbors began casting green eyes at his green vines. "Their wells were all drying up, and I was afraid they would see these vines and think I was taking all their water. But then they got educated." Now, at least two of them are planting vineyards of their own, bringing the total number in Ramona up to around thirty.

The vineyards were going in, the association was growing — its current membership stands at 42. "It was time to start taking the co-op seriously. I called Frank Karlson and got him on board. He's on the board of directors for the Bank of Ramona, he knows how to start companies, and he likes to make wine. He was the perfect partner."

GRILLED SHALLOTS CHICKEN WITH TOMATO AND ONION SALAD BY PASCAL VIGNAU

Executive Chef, Four Seasons Resort Aviara

As executive chef at Four Seasons Resort Aviara, much of my job involves supervising the hotel's five kitchens and 60 cooks. Since this leaves me little time for cooking or experimenting with new recipes, I enjoy cooking on my days off. I'm usually in charge of making dinner for my wife, my daughter Alexandra, age 6, and my son Sebastien, age 4.

I love to cook recipes from my childhood. Growing up in Provençal France, one of our favorite meals was grilled chicken with shallots served with tomato and onion salad.

dishes like Big John's all-you-can-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning — that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful enThis meal reminds me of my father, who would not eat chicken without shallots. The recipe is simple, but flavorful. The melted shallots, smoky flavor of the chicken, and tartness of the tomato salad all complement each other. This dish is a hit with my children, who, as anyone with young kids knows, don't always eat what I serve. I start my preparation with a trip to Big

per the chicken on both sides, then add the shallots. Sprinkle the chicken with half of the olive oil and then cover with foil and let marinate in the refrigerator for at least two hours.

After marinating, remove shallots from pan and mix with the remaining olive oil. Place the chicken on a charcoal grill at medium heat (approximately 300 degrees). Cook the chicken skin side first.

Rotate on the grill to get marks on the skin. After about 15 minutes, turn the chicken and baste with oil-and-shallots mixture. Cook for an additional 20 minutes and then turn again and baste with the remaining shallot mixture. Turn the heat down and cook for 20 more minutes or until the chicken reaches an internal temperature of 180 degrees at the thighbone. Remove from the grill and let the chicken

rest for about 10 minutes before serving. The salad and chicken serves four.

I recommend a Pinot Noir, slightly chilled to 58 degrees, as a good wine selection to serve with this meal.



Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold fire-crackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd conical straw hat. The food is serious, but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried Three-Ingredients *lo mein* (thick noodles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are challenging, as is the Dumpling Dinner (including hot-and-sour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork, bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jellyfish salad — crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Closed Monday. Inexpen-sive. — E.B. (5/02)

THE GOOD EGG 7947 Balboa Avenue (off Convoy Street), Kearny Mesa, 858-565-4244. The menu offers omelets, gournet pancakes, waffles, and several different kinds of frittatas. This restaurant specializes in well-seasoned Japanese-style steaks, either by themselves or in combination with lobster, shrimp, or scallops. All entrées arrive with soup, salad, rice, and Japanese-style vegetables. Seating is communal at the *teppan* tables. There's also an at-tractive, well-stocked sushi bar. Open daily. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes differ-ent. Also delish: Brahma Burrito, "Infinite Blue" (interesting brown rice salad with bleu cheese dressing), and the Shiva Wrap (tofu and fresh veggies with a well-integrated curry flavor). 

Start with a sampling of Maryam Suliman's Somalian sambussas (of chicken, beef, spinach, potato, lentils, shrimp, cheese, fruit) — each savory filling is differently seasoned. Then dive into a bowl of co-owner Vernon Sukumu's exemplary seafood gumbo. You can taste the Big Easy in every bite of NOLA-born chef Patrick Kavanaugh's Louisiana dishes, including an unbeatable jambalaya, or you can opt for African specialties such as *tibsi, zigni,* Somalian spaghetti, or a vegetarian sampler. "All you can eat" weekend brunches offer items from both cuisines, including fried turkey. No alcohol, no pork, all meats *hallal* (Muslim-butchered). Lunch/dinner Tuesday through Friday, brunch/din-ner weekends. Low moderate. — N.W. (2/02)

For lunch and dinner, the Texas menu fea-tures Texas-style barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and sausage) that's suffi-ciently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. BBQ beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. Pleasant surprises: a substantial, peppery cornmeal crust on the tender catfish and the fried green toma-toes, and the rich stock in the vegetable soup. Open 24 hours. ANTICO TOSCANO 1288 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-2768. Home-style cooking from Tuscany, unpretentious, filling, inexpensive. Good soups, salads, pastas. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.* (2/00)

CELADON ROYALTY THAI RESTAURANT 540 University Avenue (near Sixth Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-297-8424. The chef has cooked for the Siamese royal family, but more importantly, she hasn't made too many compromises in the cuisine on this side of the Pacific. Some dishes taste luxurious, and all the dishes taste authentic — and very carefully prepared. The regular entrées offer a choice of sauces (red curry, green curry, etc.) with your choice of protein, but go straight to the "Chef's Specialty" items on the menu to find the best and rarest dishes. Stuffed chicken wings are extraordinary, seafood soup *talay* is fabulous, and among the entrées, don't miss *choo chee* duck or the Queen of Thailand's favorite, Pineapple Fried Rice. — N.W. (5/02)

CITY DELICATESSEN 535 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-295-2747. Jewish specialties available here include brisket of beef, chicken-in-the-pot, chopped liver, and a wide variety of sandwiches and vegetarian items. Breakfast specials weekdays; early bird dinner for \$9.95. Open daily, breakfast, lunch, and dinner, to midnight during the week and to 2 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

COTTAGE CAFE & GARDEN GRILL 2321 Fifth Avenue (at Juniper Street), Banker's Hill, 619-696-0071. The Polish feel of this midtown café is palpable. The owners vacation in Poland yearly to update the family recipes. But you can eat American if you want, with smidgeons of Russian, Italian, and Greek, too. The "Farmer's Breakfast" is a roundup of chopped ham or sausage, onions scrambled with two eggs, home fries, and toast. Or go Polish with a grilled Polish sausage sandwich stuffed with peppers, onions, and sauerkraut on rye. A full range of Polish specialties shows up on the weekend all-you-can-eat buffet, with stuffed cabbage, beef stroganoff, sausages and cabbage, and chicken paprika. Try the Polish beer, "Okocim, 1845." but be careful—it's 8.1 percent alcohol. Great patio out back. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (9/01)*

ELAGAVE 2304 San Diego Avenue (at Old Town Avenue), Old Town, 619-220-0692. Reservations recommended. Wheelchair access difficult (steep ramp). You'll find upscale, unusual Mexican specialties in an intimate Spanish-style dining room or on a small heated balcony. The menu celebrates three great pre-Hispanic cuisines — Aztec, Mayan, Nahuatl with discreet admixtures of France, Spain, and Italy. (It's the history of Mexico on a plate.) Among the highlights are the five different Oaxacan moles (plus a sixth from Chiapas), Yucatecan-style venison, local sea bass in tangy jamaica (hibiscus) sauce, and a unique appetizer, *tlacogos cuitlacoche*, ovals of blue corn masa topped with a sort of "mushroom" that grows on corn ears. (In English it's called "corn smut," but it tastes much nicer than that sounds.) The bar stocks over 600 tequilas and makes a food-friendly onthe-rocks margarita with fresh fruit juices. Moderate. — N.W. (2/01)

ELINDIO MEXICAN RESTAURANT 3695 India Street, midtown, 619-299-0333. El Indio, "the god of Mexican food," presides over this bustling (expect a line), airy restaurant in an atmosphere of pale blue 1940s solidity. The menu includes the usual suspects (burritos, tacos, etc.), plus slightly less common items (chicken mole, *machaca, chile rellenos*). Excellent house-made corn tortillas help the standard fare to better approximate the divine. So do the sublime core flavors of the meats—the chicken in the taco, the pork in the *carnitas verdes*, the beef in the enchiladas. The *carne asada* sports a pleasant char, and the beans have a raw-beany intensity. Less heavenly: seasonings (especially paprika and salt) tend toward the heavy side. Inexpensive. —A.M. (11/01)

KEMO SABE 3958 Fifth Avenue (off University Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-220-6802. Audacity is Chef Deborah Scott's culinary signature. In her cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touches and towering heaps of garnishes. All the edible frou-frou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive *chilpotle* cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a *picante* marinade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the housestyle — sky-high, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Reservations strongly advised. Prices moderate. — *N.W.* (11/00)

LOTUS THAI 3761 Sixth Avenue (at Robinson Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-299-8272. Ironically, the best dishes at this idiosyncratic, veganfriendly Thai-Chinese restaurant involve char-grilled beef (e.g., *satay*, beef salad), featuring a very tender cut in a tangy marinade. From the long list of house specialties, try the lively pineapple-cashew fried rice, the chile-fierce "Crazy Duck" salad, or the savory (if slightly dry) "three-flavor" whole fried fish, accompanied by jammy garlicchile-fruit jam. Appetizers, though, are mainly greasy-fried wraps, and the vegetarian slant turns too many dishes bland (even when they're spicy), since the kitchen shuns Thailand's fish-based "secret sauce," *nam pla*. It doesn't help that the flesh components (shrimps, chicken, etc.) all taste like they've been parboiled in plain water and tossed into the pot at the last minute, with nothing left to give to or gain from the sauces — so if you crave soup or curry, you're best off with the elaborate vegetarian versions. Lunch and dinner daily. Low moderate. — *N.W.* (4/01)

PRADO House of Hospitality, Balboa Park, 619-557-9441. In a magical space at the heart of Balboa Park, Prado features cute neo-Nouveau decor and a something-for-everyone menu of American-Mexican-Italian-with-Asian-touches cuisine. Despite the mixed ethnicities, the food brings few surprises, but is generally flavorful and served in huge portions. Top choices include meaty crab cakes, a refreshing eggplant "napoleon," and an astonishingly tender, slow-roasted pork loin A meringue-based banana Tres Leches cake is everyone's favorite dessert. The bar makes a nice stop during a museum-crawl and offers ethereal fried oysters and a range of gussied-up margaritas. Dinner reservations vital. Interior is vast and prone to loudness, but heated, umbrella-topped terrace tables are quiet and scenic. Moderate to a lit the expensive, with reasonable wine list. -N.W. (12/00)

SASSAFRAS 3667 India Street, Mission Hills, 619-295-4745. This restau-rant claims to serve "Continental Americaine" (whatever that is), but chef-owner Andre Bellard is a son of Lafayette, Louisiana, and knows his Cajun flavors inside out when he chooses to showcase them. The Acadian seafood gumbo, which includes spicy house-made andouille sausage, is one of the best in any town; oysters Bienville resemble the better-known oysters Rockefeller, but Bellard miraculously manages to barely warm the bivalves while he bakes the lush spinach top-ping. Several other appetizers are creative flights on traditional Creole ingredients, and on Wednesday nights, there's an exuberant crawfish feast on the enclosed patio, with mudbugs shipped live from Louisiana cooked with andouille and corn in a tasty house-made "boil." Alas, the regular entrées are rather simple and not nearly so scintillating. Lunch weekdays, din-ner nightly. High-moderate. — *N.W. (2/02)*

SHAKESPEARE PUB & GRILLE 3701 India Street, uptown, 619-299-0230. Probably the most convincing English pub in town. The Bard's brew-house boasts bare-board floors, diamond lead-glass windows, and authentic Brits sitting around the bar quaffing ale from their own pewter mugs. Pub grub is bluff and plain-spoken. Shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, ploughman's plate (the pickled onions and cheese, Scotch egg, and Branston pickle make it the real thing) — all are great with a pint of rich English beer, say a Boddington's

BANDAR FINE PERSIAN CUISINE 825 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-0101. The best Persian food in the city is prepared here. It's sensuous, low-fat, and a blessing to the sight as well as the palate. Try stuffed grape leaves, yogurt, eggplant, charbroiled filet mignon, lamb, or chicken. Order all three kinds of rice. Enchanting interior, wonderful service. Not to be missed. Open daily, same menu lunch and din-ner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

BAY CAFE 1050 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-595-1083. If you're hun-gry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsome bayview ter-race (with no wheelchair access). After a chilly crossing, try the enjoyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced pota-toes. The menu features breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches, variations on fish and chips including prawns, and chili dogs (all served with generic fries), plus some entrée salads. The burgers are gen-uinely "have it your way" — for a few ex-tra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mush-rooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). Open daily, breakfast to pre-dinner. In-expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

CHIVE 558 Fourth Avenue (near Island Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-4483. Eating's an adventure at this coolly minimalist urban bistro where chef A.I. Voytko does his magic with a season-ally changing menu of inventive "mod-ern cuisine." Dishes alternate between high-risk global fusion and stringently simple combinations that place outstanding ingredients (including free-range chicken and veal) at center stage, accompanied by a revelatory repertory of exotic vegetables. The worldwide wine list offers over 50 choices by the glass. Reserve for weekend dinners when a chic young crowd pours in. Full bar. No cell phone use inside. Dinner nightly, with weekend service to 11:30 p.m. Expensive. -N.W. (9/02)

DEMEDICI 815 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-7228. This lovely, cream-and-sepia dining room evokes an Italian Renaissance villa, while its sidewalk patio offers a prime pageant of Gaslamp follies. Either way, you'll enjoy exceptional service — attentive but utterly unobtrusive — and a menu centered on succulent pastas and refined seafood dishes. The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering; Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress on the spiffier side — some Hollywood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, upping the clothing curve. Dinner nightly. Moderate-priced valet parking available. Moderate (simpler pastas) to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

DOWNTOWN FISH JOINT 407 C Street (at Fourth Avenue), downtown, 619-239-3506. Surprise: If you grab a shrimp taco at the Fish Joint and come sit outside at their sidewalk tables. you've found one of downtown's leastappreciated weekday lunch locations. With red trolleys, shady green trees, the old California Theater, and lunchtime foot traffic, the place feels positively swank. Most ask for fish and chips. But if "8 ounces of North Atlantic cod, 5-6 pieces" is too much, ask for the chil-dren's half-order. For a splurge, order the 8-ounce grilled salmon or the grilled seafood plate. Open weekdays, lunch Monday through Thursday, plus early dinner Friday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (11/01)

FIO'S 801 Fifth Avenue (at F Street), Gaslamp, 619-234-3467. This hand-some Gaslamp old-timer serves rich, comforting, serious North Italian cuisine in a civilized atmosphere, with the bar glassed off from the dining rooms, keeping the sound level low. High-quality ingredients (fine fresh fish, freerange chicken, genuinely ripe tomatoes, great Gorgonzola) are employed in well-executed dishes that are creative onzola) are employed









without going off the deep end. Great small details include fine bread with rosemary butter and an impressive wine list. There's plenty of life in this old girl yet. Full bar, heated patio. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — *N.W.* (6/01)

GARGOYLE GALLERY & CAFE 1845 India Street (at Fir), Littly Italy, 619-234-1344. One of the hidden gems of Little Italy, but there's nothing Italian about it. The Moroccan decor with Turkish pillows, exotic lamps, tiles, inside tap fountain and a sunlit courtyard all combine to turn a meal here — even though it's mostly modest *panini* ("small bread") sandwiches — into a really sexy feast. Lots of kalamata olives, feta cheese, mozzarella, ham, and tomatoes. Try "The Moroccan" with grilled eggplant, zucchini, roasted red peppers, raisins, spicy garlic chili oil, and mixed greens. Or "The Spanish" with grilled chicken, manchego cheese, sliced olives, mixed greens, and aïoli. The breakfast menu includes two-egg *panini* with grilled zucchini, marinated peppers, feta cheese, and orange slices. A must-have: French pressed coffee, a two-cug glass pot with a steel plunger. Open daily for

The breakfasts are big and filling, and the lunch chili with salad and cheese toast is a tasty bargain. So is the veggie-burger with fries, coleslaw, soup, or salad. Plus you can look down onto Broadway and check when your boss is returning to work. Breakfast and lunch weekdays. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (11/00)*

GYROSCOPE GREEK CAFE 926 Fifth Avenue (at E Street), Gaslamp, 619-235-4635. You want cheap *and* interesting food in the Gaslamp? Gyroscope's one of the few that make that list. They grind their own meats fresh daily, with beef and lamb on alternate days. (They're among the few to offer lamb *dolmades*.) The menu features the usual medium-priced kabobs, moussaka, *spanakopita*, tiger shrimps, and steak. But you can also get amply filing "sandwich" size plates for just a few bucks: beef kabob, lamb, chicken breast, and of course the gyro (marinated lamb and beef slices in pita bread). Get one of these, a glass of burgundy, and a table with a view of the passing parade, and you'll be feeling like a king. Even cheaper at lunchtime. Open daily, lunch and dinner, early dinner on Sundays. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (11/01)*





MORTON'S OF CHICAGO 285 J Street, Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxurious, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their Nebraska beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-a-half or three-pound porterhouse, which will be juicy, marbled with flavorful fat. You can also get good fish at Morton's. The big, golden salmon fillet flakes to the fork and is moist, sweet, buttery. The pricey à la carte sides are either bad or mediocre. The Godiva Hot Chocolate Cake is exceptional. But go for the steak. Expensive. — M.N. (9/99)

RAINWATER'S 1202 Kettner Boulevard, downtown, 619-233-5757. Though this attractive restaurant is noted for its fine steaks and chops, the live Maine lobster and fresh fish (especially the salmon in parchment) are outstanding here. For a low-cost meal, try meat loaf and creamy mashed potatoes. Open for lunch Monday through Friday; dinner seven nights a week. Expensive. — *E.W.*

SPICE HOUSE CAFE 1401 Ninth Street (at Ash Street), downtown, 619-239-8510. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hangover Omelet. We don't know if it's the Ortega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. The place is a pleasant surprise jutting out into the top foliage of trees sprouting up from Hwy. 163 — the view looks like a for-est. Other excellent choices include Portuguese sausage with three eggs, paisano frittata with ham, tomatoes, mush-rooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped cream. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Orig-inal branch at 9035 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Complex Drive, across from courthouse), 858-565-1028, also serves dinner nightly, with emphasis on Greek-American cuisine. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

DA KINE'S PLATE LUNCHES 1635 Sweetwater Road, National City, 619-477-8494. Also at 4120 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-274-8494. You go here for your Pacific Island fix — hundreds of Hawaiian license plates and surfboards on the walls, "Aloha Maid" Guava Nectar, and island food. Although the kalua pig here isn't cooked in an *imu* — a hole in the ground — it sure tastes like the real thing and comes with cabbage, rice, macaroni salad, and kimchee. But beware of the *haupia* cake — it may cause serious addiction. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/00)

LYDIA'S CAFE AND NIGHTCLUB 1628 Palm Avenue, Nestor, 619-429-3603. This easygoing dancing/eatery has a faithful following that goes back to 1957. But before you dance, eat! Check out the *birria en su jugo* (goat in its juices) with beans, rice, and tortillas, or enjoy filling snacks like *taquitos, cucaracha* (a corn tortilla stuffed with ham, cheese, and sour cream), or the snack Lydia says she invented: *botanas* (beans, pork, and melted cheese over corn chips). Open early to very late, seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00) **PRIMAVERA** 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454. This standout in Coronado's culinary scene offers courtly charm and an impressive menu. Try their saffron risotto, clams bordelaise, or the delicious ossobuco, of which every detail is accomplished, admirable. For dessert, have one of their excellent espressos and the tiramisu or lemon ricotta cake. Primavera's accomplished staff takes unpretentious pride in their kitchen, the food and wine they serve, and rightfully so. Open daily. Expensive. — *M.N. (11/98)*

STRETCH'S CAFE 943 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-8886. Stretch got his name in World War II when he was 6'1" and 135 pounds. Now he wants to get back to that — and he wants you that way, too, so he serves strictly nuts and twigs. His menu includes veggie salad, chicken breast and beans over brown rice, or a plate frankly named "Steamed Veggies," featuring carrots, zucchini, broccoli, mushrooms, and melted cheese on brown rice. You'll come out feeling so proud that you resisted the greasy Slamburger at Danny's bar next door. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (11/00)*

SUSHI SUSHI 600 Palm Avenue, Suite 300, Seacoast Plaza, Imperial Beach, 619-429-4373. Imperial Beach's only sushi bar really tries hard. With its pine sushi bar with roto-polished steel backboard, its white paper lanterns and paper and wood screens, its water-rooted bamboo growing out in weird shape — it feels like you've been teleported to the Ginza. Even the dishes are little pieces of art. Cheap but delish choices include *katsudon* (breaded pork, onions and egg over rice) or *nabeyaki udon* (thick noodle soup with carrots, egg, chicken, fish cake and a side dish of deep-fried battered shrimp). Or tackle a combo *bento* tray (rice, soup, salad, plus two items from a list that includes squid teriyaki, *gyoza, sashimi,* and *panko* fried oysters). Or just go the "Iapa" way, ordering sushi dishes one at a time. Your local honor-dish: the "I.B. Roll," filled with salmon egg, smelt egg, cream cheese, and avocado wrapped in salmon. Daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (5/02)*

SWADDEE THAI 1001 C Avenue (10th Street), Coronado, 619-435-8110. Tourists never stray to Swadee's quiet residential location a block from the bright lights of Orange Avenue. Their loss is the locals' gain. The dining room is a quiet, lovely haven from the hustle; the service is caring and gracious. Even if the long list of Siamese specialties is merely standard, the kitchen, too, is devoted to the art of gently giving pleasure. The peanut sauce accompanying the satay, for instance, is classically balanced; the complex but soothing coconut-chicken soup can wash away all cares; and the calamari in the many seafood arrays is cleverly knife-scored to achieve sheer tenderness along with good looks. Even the jasmine rice is an exceptionally fragrant brand. Unless you specify otherwise, spicy dishes have a nice nip tuned to brave but tender farang tastebuds. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (9/00)

TOMATOES PLUS: A CALIFORNIA BISTRO 4346 Bonita Road, Bonita, 619-479-8494. If you blink between the Baskin-Robbins and the market in the Bonita Center, you could miss this place. A mistake. Tomatoes charms you with an atmosphere somewhere between mumsy and whimsy. And it bulges with dishes that are healthy but not preachy. This is not thinly disguised rabbit food — not with dishes like chicken and eggplant salad, which comes with delicious roast eggplant and chicken strips bathed in tingling chipotle (mesquite-smoked jalepeño) vinaigrette. Or chicken Florentine (breaded chicken breast with tomatoes — of course — plus spinach, cheese, and sautéed mushrooms. To use up more tomatoes, they have lotsa pasta dishes too. And if you're feeling broke, the chili or clam chowder in an edible bread bowl will definitely fill you. Sunday champagne brunch usually has a surprise or two, and the everyday apple sausage omelet breakfast is a sweet-savory treat. Breakfast through dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (4/02)

Besides having excellent Mexican-American food, this Big Boy knock-off draws some of the most in teresting people in Tijuana - journalists, lawyers, cattle ranchers, politicians, Baja's heavy hitters. Day or night, Big Boy is always busy. Gringo food's no problem. Breakfast includes eggs, bacon, sausage, chorizo or ham, plus hash browns or frijoles, toast, juice, and end-less coffee. Nobody will object if you sit sipping the free refills till the moon comes up. But you won't — you'll crack and order more when you smell the popular, macho "royal" ham-burger, with two beef patties, smoked ham, onions, lettuce, tomatoes, fries, and salad. Or the chicken breast marinated in tequila with cilantro, guacamole, and beans. Open 24/7. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

CAFE LA ESPECIAL 718 Avenida Revolución (down the market steps), Tijuana, 685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American afi cionados of Tijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros. Summer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 lo cals-to-gringos ratio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to *carne asada* and bistek ranchero, from cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the started it all, he says, in 17-50, while the steamed taco stand upstairs. That's still going too. Open daily. CIEN ANOS Calle Jose Maria Velazco #1407, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-3039 or 634-7262, altacocina@cien-a com This lovely, comfortable, dressy-casual "des tination restaurant" serves extraordi nary Mexican haute cuisine, graced with a brilliant variety of sauces based on elaborations of Mexican ingredients, including tropical fruits, nuts, and above all a vast variety of chile peppers, each with its own distinctive flavor (not all of them spicy). You could eat here a dozen times and not begin to exhaust the possibilities. Just a few of the treats are mushrooms steeped in beef marrow, alligator meat mini-tacos, *pozole* with crab meat, and an irresistible beef and shrimp stew. (Food critic Ruth Reichl consumed a meal of exotic Aztec deli-cacies, including ant roe and mezcal worms, and you can try them too when they're in season.) The wine list is de-voted wholly to ambitious Baja wineries; you're also welcome to BYO. Bar choices include damiana and hibiscus liqueurs. Menu and staff are bilingual. Reservations (phone or e-mail) are strongly advised; ask for directions. Low-moderate. -N.W. (7/01)

Beautifully prepared meals that include appetizer, soup or salad, and entrée are available in this structure whose name means bell tower and whose exterior resembles a mission. Best bets here are filet steak on a skewer (*brocheta de filete*), baby back ribs (*costillar de puerco*), and leg of lamb (*pierna de borrego*). The portions are mammoth and the breakfast is excellent. Superb service, delightful atmosphere. Menus are printed in Spanish and English. Some English spoken. Open Monday through Saturday, 7:30 a.m. to 11 p.m., and Sunday, 7:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Moderate. — *E.W.*

UABC CAFETERIA 246 Autonomous University of Baja California cafeteria, 2580 Tecnologico Avenue, Tijuana, 607-1047 (for Tortas y Burritos Tonka). This cafeteria on the new campus near Tijuana's airport is always abuzz — the students set it alight. The difference from, say, SDSU? Everyone's well-dressed, with lots of ties and careful make-up (not on the same person). Several concessions, including Tortas y Burritos Tonka, Armando's, and Panaderia Diego deliver cheap, standard Amero-Mexican. But come for the sound of 600 people like you, all chatting like crazy (in Spanish). Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

MOVIE LISTINGS

All or Nothing — Mike Leigh comes back from his change of pace and change of scene in Topsy-Turvy, back to his normal pace and his old stomping ground, a working-class milieu in modern-day London, more exactly a utilitarian housing complex and three downtrodden families therein. He gives us (among other things) over a dozen vividly drawn characters, of varying degrees of grotesquerie and gruesomeness without ever losing their touch with reality, each one fully fleshed out from top to toe. And he gives the pivotal female role to Lesley Manville, a Leigh regular who tends to get lost in the shuffle, but who asserts herself here as one of the great actresses of the English-speaking world. (Meryl Streep great, Judy Davis great, Tracey Ullman great.) A tiny sparrow of a woman next to the overfed pigeons of her mate and offspring, a twenty-four-hour-aday worrywart, a doormat who ought to wear a sign around her neck, "Tread on me," she has all of the armor-piercing, heartskewering pathos of a D.W. Griffith heroine and none of the drummed-up melodrama. A Lillian Gish, a Carol Dempster, as photographed by a Lewis Hine, a Dorothea Lange. Her picture could be put in Webster's beside the word woe. And yet she is almost

matched by Ruth Sheen as the single mum, and free-lance laundress, who alone among the principal characters maintains a glimmer of warmth, a twinkle of humor, without a jot of encouragement or reciprocation, the neighborhood's leading candidate for canonization. To fully appreciate how great these two performances are, how completely the performers inhabit their roles, you'd need to have seen these same actresses in the same filmmaker's High Hopes - provided, that is, you could recognize them in it. Beauty and the Beast — A traditional fairytale kingdom of enchanted forest, decaying castle, and magic, poetic occurrence is laid out by Jean Cocteau. perfect in every detail: the crowd-pleasing cinematic sleights-of-hand, the resplendent, soft-toned imagery of France's "quality cinema," the fragile, fine-china beauty of Josette Day, and the humiliatingly hairy makeup of Jean Marais. 1946. ★★★★★ (KEN, 11/22 THROUGH 28)

Bowling for Columbine - Michael

Moore's engaging and enraging documentary on gun culture in America and by extension violence, homicide, and the climate of fear in America. Dishevelled as ever in his baggy clothes and collection of ballcaps (one of them emblazoned with Writer"), usually unshaven, a definitive schlump, he is still his own protagonist, no matter how antagonistic a one. Here he is, selecting a free rifle as a bonus "gift" for opening a CD account at a heartland bank cum licensed firearms dealer. Here he is, testing the theory that Torontonians don't bother to lock their homes, by going right up to some front doors and opening them (Canada comes off very well in the film, not just for the low murder rate among a wellarmed populace, but for the bedrock of social beneficence.) And here he is, escorting two crippled survivors of the Columbine school shooting to Kmart headquarters, to "return" the bullets to their place of purchase. Surprisingly — you can see it plainly on his face — Kmart capitulates to

the cease-and-desist demand, a tiny victory on Moore's quixotic quest to change the world. His search far and wide for connections and causalities, for an explanatory nexus, can at times resemble mental meandering. And he is not averse to the cheap shot and the heavy hand: a montage of U.S. foreign-affairs follies will be accompanied by Louis Armstrong's "What a Wonderful World." (Joey Ramone's sneeringly ironic cover version of the song will be heard in the closing credits.) Yet his sincerity, for all his showmanship and all his sarcasm, never seems in doubt. His lack of slickness may or may not say something about his level of expertise as a filmmaker. The film is not so much *unslick* as strategically and pragmatically *anti-slick*. The film mirrors the filmmaker. With Marilyn Manson, Dick Clark, Charlton Heston. 2002. ★★★★ (FLOWER HILL 4: GROSSMONT CENTER: HILLCREST CINEMAS; LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

Comedian — Christian Charles's intimate documentary on the private hells of stand-up comics, focussing on two in particular, one big and one small: Jerry Seinfeld, honing a new act after the end of his TV sitcom, and thirtyish Orny Adams, whose biological clock is noisily ticking. It makes you feel something like pity (of all things) for the big shot, and something like genuine worry for the small fry. There's some interesting shoptalk between Seinfeld and Leno, Shandling, Cosby; and the funniest story Seinfeld's "favorite" show-biz story - is told off-stage. 8 Mile — Screen debut of rapper Eminem a pop-star acting vehicle not unlike some of the more serious (everything being relative) of the early Elvis vehicles: *Loving You*, Jailhouse Rock, King Creole, Wild in the Country. (The Eminem character is even addressed on occasion as "Elvis.") On the

score of "realism," one cannot fault the views of the ravaged urbanscape of modern Detroit (Michael Moore territory) or the trailer-park squalor of the hero's home life; and Eminem himself, who came out of this background, does nothing in his acting to dispel the illusion. But all this grit goes only so far to cover up a hip-hop Rocky centered around a blue-eyed, blue-collar rapper who freezes on stage during the opening "battle" — fortyfive seconds apiece to trash an opponent in rhythm and rhyme - and who ultimately redeems himself in the climactic rematch. What happens in between is a sub-Scorsese series of scrapes and scuffles threaded together by a plotless blur of "What the fuck, man!" and "What's your fucking problem?' (Eminem, despite his runty size and his perpetual deer-in-the-headlights look of fright, holds his own in the physical battles, too.) And the grit, such as it is, never gets so thick as to blacken the rosy image of rap music as the voice of liberation: just what our Founding Fathers had envisioned for the disenfranchised youths of the inner cities. The un-PC "gangsta" element has been all but eliminated, and although the personal vituperation in these "battles" leads naturally to challenges of an opponent's manhood which lead naturally to imputations of homosexuality - our hero will not descend to such depths. He descends instead to the level of the grade-school playground where a rival will be perceived as vulnerable on the basis that his given name is Clarence. As in Darrow. 
into the glossy world of the 1950s "women's picture." It is mildly amazing how straight he plays it, or anyway how deadpan, although there are nonetheless as many laughs as there would be if a present-day audience were to sit and watch Imitation of Life or All That Heaven Allows, the two Douglas Sirk soapers that provide the most overt inspiration. One flagrant difference between this and those is the taboo subject matter that never could have seen the light of day on the old Universal Studios backlot: the struggles of a white-collar family man with his suppressed homosexuality ("I know it's a sickness, because it makes me feel despicable") and the possibility, if not the actuality, of a clandestine affair between a liberal-minded suburban housewife and her cultured "Negro" gardener. Somehow the director's deadpan does not hide every hint of his condescension, self-congratulation, and higher evolution. Off screen, which is to say in interviews and in the press notes, he will insist on how relevant and universal — as distinct from Universal — the material continues to be, but this might have been easier to swallow if he had updated the setting. When Rainer Werner Fassbinder paid his own homage to Sirk in Ali: Fear Eats *the Soul*, he made the same point, and made it better, by taking an old soapy story (All That Heaven Allows cross-pollinated with Imitation of Life — and clearly Haynes owes as much to Fassbinder as to Sirk) and then transplanting it into a thoroughly modern style and setting. Why could the point not just as well be made a slightly different, yet slightly more daring, way: by transporting an old story *along with the old style* into a modern setting? While it is well photographed (Ed Lachman), well designed (Mark Friedberg), well costumed (Sandy Powell), and well acted (Julianne Moore, Dennis Quaid, Dennis Haysbert), the film has a dollhouse quality that stiffens it. flattens it, squeezes the life out of it. Perhaps there's significance in the fact that Haynes's name-making first film, Superstar: The Karen Carpenter Story, was enacted entirely with Barbie dolls. Femme Fatale — Brian De Palma, as ever, exhibits abundant mechanical skills and equally abundant delight in their application. It would be fruitless to wonder what kind of career he could have had if he possessed even half a brain. Here he constructs, from a script of his own, a self-conscious *film noir* so full of baloney that we must limit ourselves, for illustrative purposes, to a single slice. Consider, to begin with, the height of the odds that a slinky jewel thief (supermodel turned commonplace actress, Rebecca Romijn-Stamos) would happen to have an exact double, unbeknownst to her, within the borders of France. And then calculate the rate of growth of those odds when the jewel thief gets thrown over a guardrail, plummets several stories through a glass ceiling, and happens to land unconscious but unharmed at the feet of her double's closest relatives, who take her straight home without a side trip to police station or hospital. It only gets worse. Alfred Hitchcock's Vertigo - and in particular its nonverbal tailing scenes, its mysterious music, its revelatory flashback, not to mention its dead-ringer motif — is plainly a major influence, as it also was in De Palma's Sisters, Obsession, and Body Double. High time, then, to acknowledge that that hugely entertaining, slightly overrated, and severely nonsensical Hitchcock thriller has granted a lot of lesser filmmakers a carte blanche for wanton nonsense. Frida — Belated contribution to Fridamania. The same-named 1984 film by Paul Leduc, while timelier, was too low-profile to discourage additional spotlight-seekers and altar-worshippers. So now we have a new chiselled Frida Kahlo (Salma Hayek), an almost Manneristically elongated one, to grace the cover of the paperback reprint of




Hayden Herrera's definitive biography, and to obstruct our view of the real woman. The movie unmistakably works a kind of magic (not to say "magic realism") in the transformation of so fascinating a life, so lavishly re-created and so lusciously photographed, into something so dull and ordinary. Certainly we might have expected some visual pyrotechnics from director Julie Taymor, who had shaken up Shakespeare in Titus. And for sure, Taymor pulls out all the stops for the grisly trolley accident that crippled the artist in her youth (though she's dancing a tango before you know it). And her voyage to New York - otherwise known as the Invasion of Gringolandia — will be done as an animated collage of paper cutouts, with her muralist husband, Diego Rivera, scaling the Empire State Building as King Kong. For the rest, this is a surprisingly pedestrian "biopic," in the subgenre of Tormented Artist, endlessly relating the marital infidelities and blow-ups ("My goddam sister! You're an animal!"), and casting only passing glances at the oh-bythe-way paintings. Taymor, in effect, is like the socialite who attends a gallery opening only in order to gossip about the artist, and who can barely spare a moment for what's on the walls. The artwork is important to her, just as Kahlo's circle of friends is important to her, only to the extent that it confers a reputation. The movie counts on the cachet of the characters to compensate for the triteness and repetitiveness of the incidents. With Alfred Molina, Geoffrey Rush, Ashley Judd, Antonio Banderas, and Edward Norton, as Diego Rivera, Leon Trotsky, Tina Modotti, David Alfaro Siqueiros, and Nelson Rockefeller, in order.

Ghost Ship — Supernaturalism at sea, from the director of Thirteen Ghosts, Steve Beck. The opening scene depicts a snapped



guy wire slicing across a crowded dance floor on an Italian ocean liner, slicing through bodies like a Weed Wacker through blades of grass, graphically illustrated with "realistic" computer effects of a torso dragging itself across the floor *sans* legs, the top half of a head sliding off the bottom half, and so forth. This constitutes a kindness to the viewer insofar as it informs him, right off the bat, of the level of taste and subtlety in store. (Ironic that the title should be lifted from the canon of horrormeister Val Lewton, taste and subtlety personified.) Nothing thereafter can shock, least of all the would-be shocks, as when a can of baked beans transmogrifies into mouthfuls of maggots. (Ick.) 

Heaven — Directed by Tom Tykwer (*Run*, Lola, Run and The Princess and the Warrior) from an unrealized screenplay by the late Krzysztof Kieslowski (*Red*, *White*, and *Blue*), this is an apparently harmonious collaboration between a couple of fatechance-coincidence guys. The extended credits sequence, during which a bomb planted in an office wastebasket blows up instead in the cleaning lady's cart, presents a powerful illustration of the theme; and it immediately establishes the intensity of commitment, every carefully selected shot clicking into place with remorseless inevitability. Tykwer in general has toned down his visual tricksiness for the occasion and cameraman Frank Griebe's soft, smooth, no-gloss color is a thing of beauty

throughout. (The Tuscany setting unearths additional things of beauty.) The solemnity never falters, even as the storyline turns preposterous: the grand romance, or amoun fou, of Philippa and Filippo, the revengeseeking Englishwoman who misguidedly planted the bomb, and the Italian policeman who helps her to carry out her revenge. Some big questions arise along the way: How does this grade-school teacher know how to make a time bomb? How is she able to come and go from police headquarters after her escape from custody? Why, if she wants only to kill the right person and not to avoid punishment for killing a few wrong ones, does she go on the lam once she accomplishes her mission? There is no bigger contradiction, though, no greater paradox, than the infinite expressiveness of Cate Blanchett's eyes inside her stiff, sanded, plaster-of-Paris face. Invincible — Werner Herzog digs up another nugget of Odd History: the story of a simple village blacksmith, Polish and Jewish, who sets out for Berlin in 1932 to assume the job of strongman in a theater called the Palace of the Occult, operated by a crank clairvovant, and closet lew, with a mind to becoming Minister of the Occult under Hitler: "I want to be to the present what the Oracle of Delphi was to antiquity." It puts Herzog in familiar company - the innocent, the visionary, the eccentric, the excluded, the intrepid, the overreaching, the grandiose and it hacks out a fresh trail into the realm of the Holocaust, with the strongman setting himself up (heroically, pathetically) as the New Samson. Anyone who knows the ways of Herzog will not be surprised to learn that the strongman is played by a two-time titlest in the "World's Strongest Man" competition, Jouko Ahola, a Finn, just as the theater's pianist will be played by a classically trained concert artist, Anna Gourari, who gets to strut her stuff in Beethoven. If this results in some awkwardness in the acting (no more than in Herzog's dialogue), it's a price the filmmaker is happy to pay. Whatever price he paid for the unctuous "professionalism" of Tim Roth in the part of the charlatan, it

I Spy — The only notable borrowings from the Cosby-Culp TV series of the late Sixties are the title and the color combination: Eddie Murphy, Owen Wilson. (Too late now, though, to boast of any pushing back or knocking down of racial barriers.) And perhaps also, if you insist, the broad genre although a stickler for accuracy might protest that the TV show stopped short of spoof and miles from slapstick. Irritating as the patty-cake repartee of Cosby and Culp could sometimes be, the hammer-and-tongs discord of Murphy and Wilson is downright painful. The two are no longer buddies, and only *ad hoc* partners; the black one is no longer a professional spy, let alone a masquerading tennis player, but a full-time horn-tooting prizefighter who refers to himself by proper name and current ring record (57-0); the white one is no longer a

master of his trade but the departmental bumbler and backstabber. ("Attitude Meets Espionage," is the ad line meant to entice you.) The mission they are on - the blackmarket auction in Uzbekistan of a stolen stealth bomber, or more to the point an "undetectable nuclear delivery system" — is played strictly for belly laughs, even down to the topical references (e.g., "evildoers" as the accepted term for enemies of the United States). What it exclusively earns, on the other hand, are gastrointestinal groans. But if this is the granddaddy of screen science fiction, what does that make Méliès's Trip to the Moon, Conquest of the Pole, et al.? Great-granddaddies, evidently. Punch-Drunk Love — A comedy of kneejerk quirkiness, from Paul Thomas Anderson, about a major-league misfit impersonated by Adam Sandler. (E.g., he stockpiles Healthy Choice puddings for the promotional offer of frequent-flyer miles, although he never flies, nor does he eat pudding.) One hardly knows which is more of a shock: that the star of Billy Madison and Happy Gilmore turns out to want to play Hamlet, or that the maker of the two-and-ahalf-hour Boogie Nights and the three-hour Magnolia can be content to make a mere ninety-minute movie. It's a cinch, in any case, that Sandler's character is not far enough removed from his usual nudniks, and that Sandler himself is not a good enough actor, for there to be any real edge to his temper tantrums, crying jags, bashful soliloquies, and whatnot. He always plays beneath himself; it's only a matter of how far. Even so, Emily Watson's romantic interest in him makes no more sense than Stella Stevens's or Jill St. John's in Jerry Lewis. Red Dragon — A remake of *Manhunter*, 1986, for the sole purpose of instating the "real" Hannibal Lecter — Anthony Hopkins - in the role. (It would have been simpler, if it would have been technologically possible, to cut-and-paste him digitally into the pre-existing film, obliterating Brian Cox.) And never mind that the aging, thickening, thinning-haired actor is here supposed to be younger than he was when he first assumed the role, over a decade earlier. Given that The Silence of the Lambs, 1991, was itself essentially a re-do of Manhunter the incarcerated psychopath assisting the FBI on a serial-murder case — the opportunities for déjà vu are manifold. The preludial explanation of how Hannibal the Cannibal initially got himself incarcerated seems a good place to start, and a few seconds before Jodie Foster walks into his life seems an obvious place to stop. (The actual climax not the false climax but the de rigueur follow-up climax - is sufficiently wellstaged to excuse its triteness.) Of course, as a mere consultant on the case, our ingratiating anthropophagite is not on screen for very many minutes; and the winner of the hot competition for most close-ups is no doubt Edward Norton as the empathic FBI profiler formerly played by William Petersen. It might not seem so, however, because the diffident Norton never scores as heavily from close range as does the taunting Hopkins or the tortured Ralph Fiennes, who misses the pathos that Tom Noonan put into the "Tooth Fairy Killer" in *Manhunter*. Another telling point of comparison with the earlier version — perhaps the single most telling -is the photography: the slick and polished image of Manhunter as against the rough, abraded image of Red Dragon. The photographer, curiously, was the same for each: Dante Spinotti. The difference, one surmises, must be the director: the preening Michael Mann versus the slovenly Brett

The Ring — Heavily hyped remake of a little-seen Japanese horror film follows around a Nancy Drew reporter (Naomi Watts) as she looks into the rumor of a videotape that kills its viewers one week to the minute after they view it. She even looks at the tape herself after intrepidly tracking down a copy of it at the Shelter Mountain Inn, where four simultaneously deceased teenagers had stayed the week previous. (The video looks a bit like a product of the 1920s avant-garde cinema, but not necessarily lethal.) She then asks the appropriate journalistic questions: "Who made it? Where'd it come from?" She has exactly one week to find the answers. Directed by the chameleonic Gore Verbinski (Mouse Hunt, The Mexican), the film is rather poorly photographed in a nauseous bluey-green or a bilious greeny-blue, but is watchable all the same. Its emphasis falls more on detective work than on cheap thrills, and it offers some quietly creepy details (the housefly in the video which can be plucked off the screen in freeze-frame mode) as well as one hair-raising scene of a panicked horse running free on a ferry. It even has a satisfactory if incomprehensible ending, before it presses on mandatorily to a less satisfactory and no more comprehensible second ending. The Santa Clause 2 — There's a lot going on, probably too much: the son of Father Christmas has landed himself on the Naughty List and requires some emergency parental attention; a contractual codicil dictates that the incumbent Santa must leave office if he fails to find a Mrs. Claus by Christmas Eve; in Santa's absence from the North Pole, a plastic facsimile of him (a fascinating make-up job) oversteps his bounds into fascist tyranny; and the Tooth Fairy, unhappy over his name, is given a prominent supporting part. Each of these

elements ends up getting short-changed. But altogether it's a serviceable holiday entertainment from Disney, in spite of the strain of wisenheimer irreverence that seems to have seeped over from the animation department. Molly Shannon contributes a show-stopping turn, suitable for Saturday *Night Live*, as a desperate blind date with Country-Western aspirations. The Searchers — It's only natural — it's only human - that in any large and loved body of artwork, something will have to be singled out as The Essential One. For some reason in John Ford's body of work, The Searchers seems to get singled out the most. At least among the cognoscenti: the ignoranti may have thought it was still Stagecoach. But no, it's this one, a solemn and self-conscious (even self-parodying) Western epic, an Iliad in Indian territory, with an Odyssey of geographical scope, in which Ford shows no surer grasp than usual of what's wonderful in his work and what's awful. John Wayne, as an unabashed racist, is one of the wonderful things (though his wide-brimmed white hat isn't); but Jeffrey Hunter as his fellow searcher and Natalie Wood as the sought-for white girl abducted by Comanches, if not awful, certainly could have been better: could have been someone else. Secretary — Naughty romantic comedy (punish it if you please) about a self-mutilator since seventh grade, fresh out of the mental institution, who finds employment and a perfect match with a lone-wolf lawyer and closet spanker. It gives away its destination, or at least part of its itinerary, right at the outset, in a graceful ballet of secretarial services performed while cuffed to a crucifixion-like yoke (stapler operated by chin, etc.), and then it jumps





back to six months earlier, taking its sweet time to return to the starting point (and beyond). The gradualness of development is one of the keys to the strategy, making sure that this feels like the unrehearsed mating dance of two autonomous oddballs, instead of the free-rein wish fulfillment of an S&M fantasist. (Although far from a pivotal peg, the concept of Sexual Harassment In The Workplace crops up parenthetically in a casual conversation among minor players, just to show that filmmaker Steven Shainberg has a certain familiarity with contemporary society and has not been secluded in some unapproachable chateau out of The 120 Days of Sodom.) The potential offensiveness is deflected by two main devices. First, the utter and total individuality of Maggie (sister of Jake) Gyllenhaal, discouraging generalization. Not so much the individuality of her case-file character (prettier sister, alcoholic father, overprotective mother, and so forth, though Shainberg is no more interested in "psychology" than was Luis Buñuel, a filmmaker who is brought to mind at numerous points), but simply the individuality of her look and manner: faintly moon-faced, buck-toothed, pig-snouted, with a twinkly Lillian Gish-y girlishness and a galumphing tomboy gait. (James Spader, more conventionally "attractive," feels obliged to signal his oddity more openly and incessantly.) Second, the absurdist, semisurrealist exaggeration, coupled with the isolated, unpeopled, quasi-laboratory setting, discouraging us from taking the thing literally. But how, then, may it be taken

figuratively and without offense? Well: how about as a metaphor of the miracle of love, the finding of the right fit, the happy discovery that what's wrong with you is all right with somebody else? Even then, however, the lightness of tone, the virtual giggliness of tone, might be felt to weaken not only the potential offensiveness but also the potential power. 2002. ★★ (HORTON PLAZA 14)

Spirited Away — Cancellation of the retirement of Japanese animator Hayao Miyazaki, whose Princess Mononoke was a worthy valedictory to the traditional handdrawn method. For this addendum to his career, he has made liberal, corner-cutting use of computer-generated backgrounds; and the clash of styles creates perhaps the most overt conflict in the entire film, together with an unwanted undercurrent of sadness and resignation. A contemporary fairy tale about a timid little girl (of indistinct race) who learns to cope - or in other words a textbook metaphor of growth — it lacks something of the drama and the narrative drive of Mononoke, though it lacks nothing in visual imagination (a fully realized spirit world where anything goes) and nothing, either, in audacity. No homegrown animated film from Disney, the U.S. distributor, would dare dish up such dreamy inscrutability. Nor would it dare drag on for more than two hours, a bit long by any measure, even though individual episodes have the fascination of a Sunday installment of Little Nemo in Slumberland. Much of the strength of its grip comes from

This means that the hero will have to be someone the MTV generation can identify with someone who proves that you can be the biggest screw-off and wise-ass and yet still be the best pilot, most irresistible sex object, most esteemed friend, etc., etc. And of course it means there will be plenty of rock music in the background, and the sound effects will be earsplitting, and the visuals will be repulsively prettified (yet strangely, grayly obscure, as if viewed through a frosted window). It means also that Howard Hawks and William Wellman, who knew flying as well as they knew filmmaking, must be spinning in their graves. Maybe not over everything: Tom Skerritt has a great manner and great haircut as one of the veteran instructors; the storyline respects the age-old traditions of male camaraderie; and the climactic dogfight, though not terribly lucid, is pretty exciting — or anyway the participants in it are pretty excited. Tuck Everlasting — Jay Russell's treatment of the Natalie Babbitt children's novel posits a backwoods family with a private

Fountain of Youth (more than that, a Fountain of Indestructibility), and it weighs the merits of an eternal life ("What we Tucks have, you can't really call living. We just are. We're like rocks stuck at the side of a river") against those of a full life. The height of the corn is established straightaway, with the garden-variety overhead shot of a nubile teen (Alexis Bledel, a younger Robin Tunney or slightly younger Thora Birch) lying supine on the grass, a garland of flowers around her head, a sort of Baby Chatterley awaiting her woodman. The ensuing romance with a hundred-and-four-year-old boy (Jonathan Jackson, with novelty-shop plastic lips) and the intrusion of a plundering Ponce de León

(Ben Kingsley) bring things, as it were, to a head. If the outcome does not make you feel like a child again, it should at any rate remind you how it felt to be addressed as one. With William Hurt, Sissy Spacek, Amy Irving. 2002. • (FASHION VALLEY 18; VOGUE)

Even with a \$1.4 million grant from the National Institutes of Health, Dr. Nicholas Gonzalez is having trouble attracting pancreatic-cancer patients for his Columbia University study (only 25 of 90 slots filled), perhaps because the treatment's most prominent component is twicea-day coffee enemas. A Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center doctor called the regimen "ludicrous," but Gonzalez said the caffeine stimulates nerves in the bowel, helping the liver with detoxification, according to an October Wired magazine report. His initial pilot program reported significant benefits of the treatment but was regarded with skepticism in that it included only 11 patients. - The for-profit school administration company Edison Schools, Inc., reportedly low on cash but with 20 particularly troublesome Philadelphia high schools to manage, tried to cut some corners in September until reined in by the school board. According to an October dispatch in Toronto's Globe and Mail, Edison ran low on cash and (1) had to send back newly ordered textbooks, computers, lab supplies and musical instruments; (2) tried to move its Philadelphia executives out of their downtown offices and into vacant school-system rooms to save on rent; and (3) suggested to the school board that students could acquire valuable experience if they were assigned various work projects (for free) for Edison. The latter two ideas were thwarted by the school board, but the students were still

Government in Action

· Several doctors of the government-funded British National Health Service plan to start prescribing personal vibrators for female sexual dysfunction, according to a September report in The Observer. A sex boutique operator welcomed the development, describing the previous devices "used for dilating vaginas" as "frightening" and crosses between "toilet brushes and medieval torture implements." (In October, the medical clinic at the private Cornell University was about to begin selling vibrators in its dispensary.)

 In October, the State Department awarded a \$15,000 "outstanding performance" bonus to the head of the office that permitted 13 of the 19 Sept. 11 hijackers to enter the country via expedited U.S. visas. Mary Ryan, who retired in September after a 36-year tenure (reportedly eased out after she defended her "visa express" program even after Sept. 11), received the award specifically for the 12-month period beginning April 2001. The express program, which was spearheaded by the U.S. Consul General in Rivadh, Thomas Furey (who also got a bonus), allowed Saudi nationals to apply over the Internet without ever being seen by a U.S. official.

Great Art!

- A state humanities and arts panel named Amiri Baraka the poet laureate of New Jersey earlier this year, several months after he had written a poem suggesting that Jews and President Bush had advance knowledge of the Sept. 11 attacks. Gov. James McGreevey, who announced the appointment in August 2002, now wants Baraka to resign, but Baraka has refused. In addition to the \$10,000 the poet laureate receives from the state, Baraka has gotten several five-figure taxpayer grants for his poetry, favorite themes of which are attacks on religion, whites and Jews.

- Sculptor-painter Antonio Becerra's government-funded "Oils on Dogs" exhibition

opened in Santiago, Chile, in August, consisting of the artist's paintings (e.g., Pope John Paul and a cross, blue and orange butterflies) on the embalmed cadavers of a dozen roadkill dogs Becerra had found on the city's streets. Becerra called the work a reflection of society's violence and cruelty, but animal rights activists were appalled at his lack of respect for the dogs.

- Retired graphics designer J. Jules Vitali has created more than 1,000 pieces of small art in his preferred medium, foam polystyrene (Styrofoam) cups (some with flourishes of acrylics or bronze), according to an October Boston Globe profile. He took up his craft with a carry-out coffee cup and a Craftsman knife 20 years ago, inspired, he said, by boredom. A display of his "Styrogami," with pieces priced at up to \$800, is housed at the Freeport (Maine) Public Library.

People Different From Us

- Recent Paraphilias: Ian Cheeseman, 34, already locked up in Ottawa, Ontario, was charged in September with having made about 250 collect calls from prison trying to trick young girls (by offering them Backstreet Boys concert tickets, among other things) into urinating into a cup near the phone. And a judge in Omaha, Neb., ruled in October that a confession made by former teacher Mike Florea, 35, was admissible in his sex-abuse trial; he had told police that he would pay boys \$20 to \$25 if they would ejaculate into small containers, which Florea then stored in his freezer.

Least Competent Criminals

- Chattanooga, Tenn., police told the city's WTVC-TV in October that they had arrested Rudy Raines for possession of about a pound of marijuana after Raines allegedly walked nonchalantly into a Fast Food and Fuel convenience store, past officer David Ashley, and uninhibitedly placed a stash of marijuana into the store's microwave oven because, he said, he needed to dry it out. Raines was arrested, along with another man sleeping in Raines's car in the parking lot.

- More Flaming Pop Tarts: Deanna Robinson and her insurance company filed a lawsuit in Atlanta in August against Kellogg's, alleging that the poor design of Pop Tarts is the reason one burst into flames in her toaster two years ago, igniting a house fire that did more than \$10,000 in damage. 



Mama, This Bed

We retired the crib. For the past ten years, my husband Jack and I have had a baby in a crib. I remember shopping for baby furniture. A million years ago when I was a lawyer and Jack and I had been married less than a year and we were expecting our first child, we drove one Saturday morning to a baby furniture store somewhere on Miramar Road. I had no idea how much baby furniture would cost. I gasped at the elaborate hardwood designer cribs, the matching bumper/quilt/pillow combinations. "Oh, my gosh," I told Jack. "We could spend thousands of dollars to set up the nurserv."

Jack shook his head. We ended up with a simple blond wood crib with an arched headboard and footboard. We got a changing table that matched. I registered for baby bedding with a multicolored fish pattern since we didn't know whether we were having a boy or a girl.

Jack put the crib together in a sunny room in our house in Clairemont. For the first month or two of her life, our oldest daughter Rebecca slept in a basket beside our bed. I remember the first night Rebecca slept in the crib. She lay on her back, a tiny lump in the crib's vast, fishcovered expanse.

Twenty-five months after Rebecca was born, we had Angela. The month before Angela's birth, on the night of Rebecca's second birthday, we moved Rebecca into her big-girl bed. Once again, she looked like a tiny lump in the vast expanse of her bed. Angela slept in the basket for a couple of months, then moved into the crib.

Twenty-one months after Angela, Lucy came along. Twenty-one months after that, Johnny was born. I thought I was done having babies. During the years since Rebecca's birth, we had moved three times. Every time Jack put the crib together in a new room, he said, "I don't know how many more times we can move this crib. It's getting awfully wobbly."

The last time lack told me the crib wouldn't last much longer, I said, "It only has to last until Johnny moves into a bed." Twentyseven months after Johnny was born, we welcomed Benjamin into the world. By the time

I laid Benjamin in the crib, the mattress had ripped and the plywood underneath the mattress had cracked from the older kids jumping in the mattress en masse one rainy Sunday afternoon. The fish quilt and bumper pad had faded. Ben didn't seem to mind. He laid his head to the side, stuck his thumb in his mouth, and snoozed away

Last Sunday after Mass, I asked Jack, "Can you please take the crib out of the boys' room?" For the previous three nights, Ben had started the night sleeping in the bottom bunk while Johnny slept in the top bunk. All three nights, somewhere around 2:30, Ben would climb out of his bunk, walk to the crib, and cry, "Mama, this bed. Mama, this bed." All three nights, Jack or I stumbled out of bed, made our way down the hall, and lifted Ben into his crib.

After one of Ben's nightly forays, Jack returned to bed and grumbled, "We've got to get the crib out of that room. If he can't see the crib, he won't want to get back into it."

Sunday afternoon, Jack started up the stairs. I sat at the dining room table reading the paper. "Want to come upstairs and help me take the crib apart?" Jack asked Johnny. 'Sure, Daddy," Johnny answered.

Ben, who turned two in September, fol-

lowed Johnny and Jack up the stairs. "A hep you, Daddy?" he asked.

Yeah, you can help, too," Jack told him. I heard Jack and Johnny and Ben milling around in the boys' bedroom. I heard the sound

of wooden slats rattling against each other. Then I heard a commotion at the top of the stairs. "Hold on," Jack said. "One, two, three, GO!"
