Disabled Disgust

The recent letter from the destitute family living in their car appealing for help has made me more angry and disgusted than filled with pity.

I too am disabled. Six years ago this coming April I was attacked and brutally beaten by a "boyfriend," or, rather, a homicidal maniac I had known for approximately four months. He jumped me from behind as I attempted to walk away from a confrontation, crushing my spine, and proceeded to beat the living crap out of me, including breaking my nose.

Two years later I was forced to undergo major back surgery, consisting of deflating my right lung to access my upper vertebrae to place a metal plate and rods in place of my crushed bones. When I regained consciousness, it was revealed that my right leg was completely paralyzed and my left leg and foot were also numb. My doctor informed me that I probably wouldn't return to work for about two years. I went back within four months. I chose to work the graveyard shift to avoid traffic and each night propped a flashlight in my lap to be able to see the brake and gas pedals since I couldn't feel where my foot was. The fact that I didn't have a major accident and end up dead or injuring someone else is an absolute miracle.

To this day, my right leg has never fully regained use, and my left foot is still rather numb. The pain in my back has somewhat subsided, but the fact remains that my body will never be the same.

It would have been quite easy to have just given up and succumbed to the depression and disability, but I chose to push myself, hoping one day my body would return to normal.

I live alone, so no one helps me clean, do laundry, grocery shop, or assists me in any way. I certainly don't have the income to hire people to wait on me, and

Family money Lawyer Lisa Foster, wife of controversial San Diego Unified School District chief Alan Bersin, didn't give any money to the campaign of Governor Gray Davis, who just appointed her a Superior Court judge, but

her mother and husband did. On August 19, Pauline Foster, widow of wealthy San Diego County real estate mogul Stanley Foster, gave the Davis campaign \$2500. A week before that, Bersin also kicked in \$2500. In June, Lisa Foster herself gave \$1000 to Senator

Barbara Boxer. In addition, Bersin gave \$250 each to the New Hampshire congressional campaign of Democrat Katrina Swett, the congressional campaign of Palm Springs Democrat **Elle Kurpiewski**, and the North Carolina congressional campaign of Janice Cole, like Bersin an ex-United States Attorney. All three lost ... When **Fred Schenk** was appointed to the Del Mar Fair board by Gov-

ernor Gray Davis last week, he had at least two things going for him. The 49-year-old San Diego attorney is the brother of Lynn Schenk, longtime friend and chief of staff to Davis. And on September 9, he gave a healthy \$25,000 to the governor's already well-funded re-

election campaign. When Pete Wilson was governor, he appointed to the board Robin Parsky, wife of GOP fat cat Gerald Parsky, whose fundraising was financially indispensable to Wilson's campaigns. The fair board members are drawn predominantly from the ranks of lawyers and wealthy real estate developers, and the board's ambitious development plans for the fairgrounds are in perpetual conflict with Del Mar environmentalists ... Schenk and the Foster clan weren't the only San Diego locals to make big personal contributions to Davis. Others include La Jolla's Leon L. Tan, chief executive officer of the Pacific Millen-



nium Paper Group, a large but obscure private company doing business in China and Southeast Asia. Tan gave Davis \$50,000. Ex–port director, gay activist, and El Cortez Hotel developer **Peter Janopaul** gave \$25,000, as did Premier Food Services honcho George

Karetas, who has a Del Mar Fair connection of his own. Premier holds the liquor license for the fairgrounds and two years ago had a brush with controversy when a temporary nightclub on the grounds was shut down following an investigation into drug dealing and underage-drinking allegations. Dan Epstein, CEO of the Conam Group, which owns and

operates 40,000 apartment units, gave Davis

Piper's penalties First it was Houston's **Denny Piper**, who traveled west last year to assume the reins of the county's data-processing operation. Trouble was, Piper left his job as Houston's technology chief in the middle of a nasty influence-peddling scandal, and he was later accused of stealing \$250,000 from yet another ex-employer. After repeated assurances from San Diego County officials that Piper was an okay guy, he



quit his job here and returned to Texas to face criminal charges. Now comes the case of **Parvesh** Singh, the new financialaid director of Alliant International University, formerly known as United States International University, in Scripps Ranch.

The Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported last week that Singh is up to his ears in a financial scandal at Atlanta's historically black Morris Brown College, which, the paper says, is being investigated by federal auditors and is in danger of losing its accreditation for mishandling student financial aid, as well as having a \$27 million deficit. The school's ex-president, Dolores Cross, who quit to return to her hometown of Chicago, told the paper, "I took steps to replace Parvesh," then Morris Brown's financial-aid director, after problems spiraled out of control. Singh told the paper he had nothing to do with the problems and blames ex-financial officer Jonnie Brown for much of the trouble. Brown has filed a wrongful-termination suit against the school, alleging that Cross paid a housekeeper, chauffeur, and personal shopper out of school funds. Singh could not be reached for comment.

Murphy's pistol-packing posse

Locals might not guess it from the menacing appearance put in by Mayor Dick Murphy's bodyguards during last week's Holiday Bowl parade, but Murphy is said to be one of the least protected mayors in the U.S. At the parade, Murphy, riding in an open car, was shadowed by two beefy men, one of whom held his hand just inside his suit coat, as if fingering a pistol. But the Detroit Free Press reports that Murphy has nothing on Detroit mayor Kwame Kilpatrick, who boasts a force of 30 full-time cops to protect him and his family. The Free Press quotes Murphy press secretary Colleen Rudy as saying Murphy has only 3 police protectors. "Even if there were that many available, I don't think our mayor would take it," said Rudy about Kilpatrick's guard numbers.



Once You're Wet, You're Done

ne night in 1999, eight illegal immigrants died during a spring snowstorm in the mountains of San Diego County. Such

alarming statistics spurred the Border Patrol to expand its mission to form two teams to prevent such occurrences. One such team is Border Search Trauma and Rescue, known within the Border Patrol by the acronym BORSTAR. The other, headed by agent Rich Gordon, is the First Alert Snow Team (FAST). "The FAST team was created in October of 2000," explains Gordon, who heads the team, "with agents just from the Campo station. Because of our area of operation, we know these East County border areas. We started thinking, 'What can we do to prevent these disasters?' So we got together guys that knew the backcountry, and we got the equipment that we needed to be able to access these areas. And instead of waiting for storms to happen and reacting to situations, we started doing proactive response. During the snow season, we watch the weather forecasts, and prior to a storm arriving, we go out to these canyons we know are used by migrants, and we make sure to the best of our ability that nobody is out in these canyons and remote areas. Then we monitor dur-

ing the storms to try to keep anybody from entering during the storm. We also send out flyers to all the local residents from Mt. Laguna to the border, and we post signs at all the public places and parks explaining that we're expecting inclement weather, and if you see anybody to please let us know because their lives are in danger. We also call Grupo Beta, which is the border police on the south side, and they go out to where they know the migrants are gathering on the south side of the border, and they warn them not to cross the border because a storm is coming.

"These people don't really know what they are in for out there," adds Border Patrol agent Ben Bauman. What they're in for is long hikes over rough and sometimes steep terrain. And, if they're crossing between November and April, the possibility of wet, freezing weather. Not only are they

not prepared for these circumstances, they're intentionally misled to believe the crossing will be a snap. "I hear this with all the groups that we apprehend or arrest," says agent Gordon, who works out of the Border Patrol's Campo office. "They

get to Tijuana or Mexicali, they make arrangements with a smuggler to be brought into the United States and taken to some city. These smugglers are so ruthless, they look at these people as a commodity, and they tell them, 'Within a couple of hours across the border, you will be in a vehicle on your way to Chicago,' or wherever they want to go. We hear that every single time. In reality, it is two, three, four days later, and they are still walking in these remote areas without water and, in winter, without

weather. Add a snowstorm, and it becomes deadly. "They might cross on a day when it's sunny and 70 degrees," Gordon says, "but two days later, they're still walking and one of these storm fronts can blow in, and they have no idea that it is coming. And when it hits the East County mountains, it hits with a vengeance. The temperatures just plummet. And these people have no idea what they have gotten themselves into. They may be nearing their pickup point, and here comes this cold

warm clothes. They are physically exhausted and have no idea where they are. And these smugglers, if somebody falls behind, they will just leave them. We have found so many people wandering around out there, lost, and we will ask them, 'What happened?' and they will say, 'I fell behind, I couldn't keep up with the smugglers.'

The situation would be dangerous enough in good

front. And it doesn't have to be snowing. Freezing rain is even worse. That's how these things happen."

"Landmark's strategy of presenting intelligent, alternative cinema, including independent and foreign-language films, proved to be an excellent match with the discriminating, adult audiences of La Jolla. The single-screen theatre with more than 500 seats thrived under Landmark's management."

As it turns out, they're happy to explain. Randy Haisfield, manager of HPA Properties, said they would very much like to keep Landmark as their tenant. "But Landmark won't commit to a long-term lease under market-rate conditions."

Obviously, there is a misunderstanding. With better communication, things might be worked out. So to help the discriminating, adult audiences of La Jolla, I called Landmark's headquarters in Los Angeles to share the good news with Mr. Richardson. Before I mentioned my conversation with Mr. Haisfield, he assured me that HPA "gave us notice to leave."

"It's not just a matter of meeting their terms?" I asked.

"Ah, did you talk with them?

Yes. They said you weren't willing to pay the market rate."

"We're paying the market

rate now! We'd like to stay. But we'd like to see it fixed up. It's a marginal operation."

I'm unclear how "a marginal operation" could have "thrived under Landmark's management," but I'm quite certain that that management is attempting to negotiate a more favorable lease agreement, perhaps even hoping for public pressure to help make its case in the "ongoing discussions."

Worrying about the Cove made me wonder about the Dove, more commonly known by it's Spanish name, La Paloma. (The Cove, being in La Jolla, is a theatre, whereas La Paloma, being in Encinitas, is a theater.) Perched almost directly un-

der the "Encinitas" sign straddling Highway 101, with only the Martini Ranch between it and D Street, La Paloma has been an important part of the community since 1928.

How has it survived? Would it soon be going the way of other single screens?

Allen Largent, the present owner, met me at the front door and started ushering me through a darkness so absolute I couldn't see my feet. When I reminded him that I didn't know where I was going, he turned on a pen light and held it at his back as he led me across the lobby, up the stairs, through the projection room, and into an office smaller than many

shower stalls. A light shining through the open window revealed a desk cluttered with calendars and notes, a TV and video in one corner and a computer in the opposite

Largent speaks in a soft voice, a faint tone of weariness in it. He has the thinning, somewhat unruly hair of a middle-aged man. He was dressed in a black Tshirt, olive shorts, and hiking boots. He looked relaxed, at home.

He started working at La Paloma when he was a kid. "I started out cleaning up," he said, "and my brother was a projectionist and he trained me to project. Just worked my way up to assistant manager and then manager. In 1986 the property and business sold, and basically with that went my job."

He went on to other things, working for painting contractors and doing handyman jobs on the side. But he kept his nose in the theater business. "I salvaged a couple of theaters when they closed out," he said. "I bought up the equipment and kept a few things for myself, thinking that someday I might get back in the business.

That opportunity came in November 1992 when La Paloma became available. Largent took all his savings around \$10,000 — and



bought the fixtures, equipment, and trade name. The owners of the building gave him a one-year lease, with a five-year option.

"I felt like I could make a go of it," he said. "It was very run down. You couldn't find two seats side-by-side that would work. It's just been a steady progress and evolution. You know, fix things as they break and make 'em better, and occasionally throw in a new thing.

"I started off with a couple of kids and myself, just to get the ball rolling. We weren't real busy at first. They did the popcorn and tickets, and I was doing the projections." He did other things, too: he was plumber, electrician, janitor — making good use of his jack-of-all-trades skills. "That's how we've been able to survive and to prosper, actually. Do a lot of the stuff in-house to keep the overhead down."

Largent is a custodian not simply of a building but of a tradition. "People have a lot of memories," he said. "Mary Lou in the back row, and of course the couches on the side. They were only here for a short time, but they made a big impression. But what most people don't remember is that in the center section were wooden church pews. Big, long wooden benches. But the couches they weren't very practical. The same footprint that one of the couches took up I probably have 10 to 15 seats in. You could get into them and extend your feet straight out, with a little table to set your drink on. You know, people would bring their blankets and their bottle of wine."

"When was this?" I asked.
"This was probably '77 to
'82, right in there."

"Do you suppose that today there are people in San Diego named Paloma because of them?"

"I wouldn't be surprised." In the '70s many musical groups came through, but Largent doesn't book as many these days. "It's a lot more work to do concerts than putting a film on the screen. People want to bring in three or four bands. Very, very easy to have injuries,

even easier to have damage to the facility, and I've worked way too hard and way too long to have to deal with those stresses."

"Have crowds ever gotten out of control?" I asked.

"It's happened a few

times. Early on I was more inclined to do rock and roll acts. Sprung Monkey or Pennywise..."

"That's what I said at first. Aggressive punk rock. Someone onstage started provoking the audience — 'Come on up here, screw the security guards!' It's young people, hard-driving music. They uprooted the first couple of rows of seats and put them in the second and third row. Made a mosh pit. We


had 15 security guards or something like that. But you can't control a large crowd. You learn from every single show you do, every day."

a movie has been out, what nearby theaters are playing, how soon it will appear on video, and what bookings he may already have at the theater. A children's play on Friday and Saturday nights would rule out a first-run film, "because if a distributor is spending millions of dollars on marketing, it would be a breach of contract not to show it. They don't want you monkeying around with their show. They don't want to lose prime time."

I commented that La Paloma seems to feature a wide variety of things, everything from Christian Youth Theater to The Rocky Horror Picture Show on Friday nights at midnight. "Well," Largent responded, "why close up your doors on Friday night when you could be doing a movie that's making you another three or four hundred dollars a week?

"And many old theaters like this have just boarded up their stage, and I think that's a huge mistake. You know, the screen flies. Fly it up, and now you've got a stage and utilize it. A lot of money that we've invested in the company in the last five years has been for the stage."

The theater is an important part of the Encinitas community. "We've got a strong clientele," he said, "that wants to make sure La Paloma prospers and continues to grow. It's a doubleedged sword, though. It's almost like a public trust. I'm just trying to run my business, do the best I can, and I get a lot of calls from people wanting to do fundraisers and things like that. I want to be a community theater on the one hand, but on the other hand I want to maintain, you know, a little independence."

"How about that business?" I asked. "Are you surviving? Are you making it financially?"

"Oh, yeah. We just signed a ten-year lease."

"How have you done it?"

"I think a lot of it is just resourcefulness on our part, and tenacity. Just coming in here day after day after day. I'm run ragged 24/7. I'm wearing all the hats. I do everything from payroll to plumbing to projection. I typically arrive at the theater in late morning, and I'm here until midnight or later."

"Do you have a family?" I asked.

He shook his head and said quietly, "No, couldn't do that. A bone of contention in some of my relationships.







have been some close calls. "I remember we got [a ground sensor] activation in an area where it had been

snowing the day prior," he recalls. "When we found the footprints and started following them, we kept noticing very small footprints, which led us to believe that these were small kids. We couldn't believe that in this remote area we would find little kids, and we followed them for about eight hours. When we finally caught up to them, it was a mother and her three young daughters and one other man. The oldest girl was 14 and the youngest was 7. They had no winter clothing and no food and they had been up there for 17 hours walking. Had it not been for us, they would not have found their way. Right there on the spot, we gave them all the food we had, blankets, and hot packs. As we started loading them up, the little girl started crying because her feet were really hurting. It shows you how ruthless these smugglers are. They knew what they were going to put these kids through."

Members of Gordon's First Alert team drive fourwheel-drive Dodge pickup trucks sporting camper shells, off-road tires, and bumper-mounted winches. "If a storm is coming, I'll load it up with a bunch of backpacks filled with food, blankets, and hot packs. And the FAST team agents carry GPSs [global positioning systems]. That's about the extent of our equipment."

If the First Alert Snow Team fails to head off migrants as they unwittingly walk into a storm, and a rescue ensues, then the Border Search Trauma and Rescue team takes over. Agent Keith Jones is one of the group's supervisors. "Usually we get 24, 48, and sometimes if we are lucky 72 hours' notice if there is going to be bad weather," Jones says, as he steers his Chevy Tahoe up Sunrise Highway. "What we will do is when we get confirmation from the weather service that there are storm conditions predicted for the mountains, we will activate our units around the clock. The FAST team will go out and then our BORSTAR guys will go out and will start looking in these high mountain areas for any indication that people may be in the area. We will look for tracks or signs or any other indications that somebody has passed through. Because this terrain is so nasty out here, it is a two-, three-, four-day trip depending on where they are going. So if we get 24 hours', 36 hours' notice

that a storm is coming in, and we've got fresh signs coming across the roads, we know they are going to be in

the heart of the storm right when it hits. So we will go try to find them before the weather hits."

When the storm hits and they know migrants are out in it, the search-and-rescue team stages its four-wheeldrive command bus "somewhere up around Sunrise Highway, up on top of Interstate 8," Jones says, "kind of the heart of our threat area. That way we can rapidly deploy east and west depending on where we need to be.

Because we are already staged out here, when we get a location that somebody is in jeopardy out there, we are right there and we jump right on it."

Jones, medium-sized, fit and muscular with a blond

flattop haircut, pulls over on a turnout about ten miles north of Interstate 8. To the south, the land drops steeply away into a pine-filled canyon 1000 feet below. "This is one of the areas where we had a big search,"

he recalls, "in the winter season of 2000. We had a group of five or six out in a storm, and a snow-plow driver was coming down the road, and a couple of them flagged him down, and he called us. We showed up and they told us they had left a couple of females and a male south. We sent some men down to them. One of them we actually managed to get out, but she had a core temperature of around 84 degrees. A lot of times when their core temperature is down to that point for any length of time, they don't make it to the hospital, or if they do, a lot of things start shutting down on them. But we managed to get her out. The other two unfortunately were deceased by the time we got to them."

"When it snows up here," Jones continues, as he drives back down Sunrise Highway toward I-8, "it is usually just below freezing or just above freezing. So the snow is really wet and sticky, and when it hits you it doesn't brush off. It sticks and melts and then you are wet. And once you are wet, you are done."

In most situations when the search-and-rescue team is deployed, endangered migrants are rescued and carried out by search parties, usually four or five, of volunteer Border Patrol agents on foot. The volunteer agents are all emergency medical technicians and are certified in basic search-andrescue techniques. And each of them is a specialist in one aspect of search and rescue, such as rope work, tracking, or fast-water rescue. If visibility permits, the injured and near-frozen are lifted out by the Border Patrol's helicopter.

On the way back down the mountain on Interstate 8. Jones recounts another dramatic rescue effort that took place on April 2, 1999. A late-season snow storm dumped a foot and a half of snow on surprised migrants trekking north in and around Nelson Canyon, a couple of miles east of the junction of Interstate 8 and Highway 79. Border Patrol, Sheriff, and Coast Guard helicopters took part in a massive rescue mission. "Eight people died that day," Jones recalls, "but I consider it a successful mission because we saved over 50 people." ■







Dear Matthew Alice:

"We're an interesting contradiction. On the one hand, we seem very conservative. We're strong advocates for the sanctity of marriage. We don't ordain women. We don't have gay clergy. But, on the other hand, we follow the

religious teachings of a man who claimed to have a supernatural experience that lasted for 27 years, in which he spoke with people who were dead. And that would sort of seem to be something that surpasses the most liberal and out-there New Age religions."

Reverend Mark Perry is the South African who for the past six months has pastored the San Diego New Church in Linda Vista. When I spoke with him early last week, I asked him to nail down for me how Swedenborgians differed from mainline Protestants. Swedenborgians have been in America since 1792. Their namesake, Emmanuel Swedenborg, was a genius. A Lutheran visionary. He was an 18th-century Swedish scientist.

"We're non-Trinitarian. We believe that God the Father and Jesus were one and the same. We don't

believe that Emmanuel Swedenborg was a prophet or in any way holy. We believe that in all times of darkness and evil, God calls forth someone who will renew His message to humanity."

Emmanuel Swedenborg wrote more than 30 volumes of commentary on the Bible, on its secret, esoteric meaning as revealed to him during his 27-year sojourn in the spiritual realm. His self-confidence is not to be underestimated. He created an esoteric tradition within a Protestantism that had rejected mysticism and hocus pocus. Sweden rejected him. The Lutheran Church rejected him. His teachings found a home in England, which had endured an unhappy Reformation.

"I think you'll see some of that in our liturgy," Reverend Perry told me. "I think we borrowed liberally from the Church of England, from the Book of Common Prayer."

What I noticed last Sunday morning when I attended Reverend Perry's church was the outline of the liturgy as celebrated by

Roman Catholics, Lutherans, and Anglicans. But there was no cross or crucifix in the church. Instead, Reverend Perry and his 40 or so congregants knelt before an open Bible. The Word. The Text as object of adoration. A variation of what you would see in any synagogue — Reform, Conservative, or Orthodox. But Reverend Perry and his congregation sang old-fashioned Protestant hymns. And when they said the Lord's Prayer, there were differences. "Our Father who art in the heavens." Emphasis on the plural. Little signs and signals that things weren't as they might at first seem.

Swedenborgians believe with their hearts that the Bible isn't in general to be taken at face value. They are Protestant kabbalists. Reverend Perry told us that he was speaking about the Nativity as recorded in the Book of Mark. But his sermon diverged in unexpected ways. He alluded to Egypt, the Magi, the Three Kings

who brought gifts to the Christ child.

"The Wise Men knew from a series of natural symbols that the Lord was to be born," he told us.

Reverend Perry elaborated on the gifts they offered. How the gold, frankincense, myrrh, were both literal offerings and yet also symbols, or, in Swedenborgian parlance, "correspondences," for more profound states of being that a believer must offer up before God.

Reverend Perry's church is a small one. Reverend Perry's baby son, Sean, fretted and whined. And Sean's fussiness reminded me of how seriously Swedenborgians take the idea of family. Swedenborg's long visits in the spiritual realm taught him that family was forever. The love between husband and wife, parent and child, were but a foretaste, an inkling, of the ever-

lasting love of God for humanity.

"Anyone who sincerely loves God and shuns evil, will have a place in heaven," Reverend Perry told me after last Sunday's service. Sean squeezed his knees. Sean hugged his neck.

Reverend Perry and his wife live in a modest home next door to the church whose members built it from the ground up. The oldsters remember plastering the church's walls, fitting the stained glass in its entrance.

"We feel very blessed to be here," Reverend Perry told me about his new home.

For the new year he's starting a series of classes on "regeneration," a topic central to Swedenborgian teaching.

"Salvation isn't a one-time thing. A simple declaration of faith in Jesus as one's personal savior. It is a process. A process of waking up from the mundane matters of life. It's a matter of replacing a selfish sense of what it means to be a human being and replacing it with a holy one."





"This has a spice to it which I like but it is not avocado," said friend Shawn, diving into the Lucerne Olé Guacamole Dip (\$1.99 for 12 ounces at Vons). "A sour cream and chili pepper taste, with no avocado," added chum Bernice. "It could pass as a party dip, but there is no gua-

We moved on. Calavo makes a few varieties of guacamole dip. Calavo Fiesta Guacamole (\$3.99 for 12 ounces at Vons) was no party. "If there is avocado, it is over the hill," UCERNE moaned Bernice's grimacing husband agannole

"With the added pleasure of sour citrus," laughed Bernice.

Calavo Mild Guacamole Dip (\$4.29 for 12 ounces at Ralph's) was a tad less offensive. "The Fiesta Calavo had spice and burn," said Bernice, "which this one lacks. This one is sour where there should be avocado.'

Calavo Homestyle Guacamole (\$4.29 for 12 ounces at Ralph's) was the best of the three Calavos. "A prickle right up in the front of the mouth," stated Frank.

"The Homestyle is a little more balanced, a little avocado, a little lime, a little salt flavor," added Bernice.

"Homestyle: We actually put avocados in it," scoffed Frank.

On we headed, to the bizarre, limey color of the Dean's Imo Zesty Guacamole Dip (\$2.59 for 12 ounces at Ralph's). "The chili powder flavor is primary," Frank said, "and the spice lasts longer than did the Lucerne dip.'

The dip brought general disappointment around the table. As did the Albertson's Avocado Dip (\$1.99 for 14 ounces). Hubby

Patrick gasped, "This is exceedingly oily, like olive oil. "Or peanut oil,"

added Frank, "it is really heavy." We left those

duds behind and dug into the Trader Joe's dips. First up, Trader José's Fresh Guacamole (\$2.99 for 16 ounces), which brought opposing views from the tasters. "I would not buy this, it is too spicy," exclaimed Shawn.

"It is leaps and bounds better than the ones we have tasted so far in terms of avocado taste," disagreed Patrick. "It is a little sour up front, which is maybe in the tomatoes. But I like this. It's real avocado."

"I actually taste lemon in this," smiled Bernice.

Trader Joe's Fire Roasted Guacamole (\$3.19 for 16 ounces) did not fare as well in the tasting. "This is not as tasty as the Trader Joe's Fresh Guacamole," Patrick opined. "It has a charred taste to it. Is that "I would never believe you could buy an avocado dip that tasted this good."

what the fire roasted is supposed to mean?"

We paused for wine and swigs of beer and Shawn let us in on her baby-food tip. "The second food I gave my daughter, after giving her rice cereal, was avocado. It is rich in vitamins and a whole food. And to this day, it is one of her favorites."

Having rested the digestion for a minute, we forged ahead into the Whole Foods Dips. Fresh Scotty's California Style Guacamole (\$3.69 for 12 ounces) brought more disagreement. "The texture is not avocado and it is too thin," said Shawn.

Patrick disagreed. "I like it. It has natural

"Yes, it has strong avocado flavors, though it's watery," offered Bernice. "Not enough salt..

"...though a nice mild genuine avocado flavor," Frank interjected.

We left that argument behind and peeled open the lid to Fresh Scotty's Sante Fe Style Guacamole Dip (\$3.69 for 12 ounces at Whole Foods). It was covered in crushed tomatillos and carried more zip than its cousin. Bernice and Frank were fighting over the bowl. "I am in love with that," exclaimed Frank, "but I am in love with the tomatillos. I adore that!" he said with his mouth full of chips and gua-

camole and his hand delving into the bowl for another large dip.

"That is my new favorite," agreed Patrick, who loves to make homemade guacamole. "But the problem with all of these dips is that the texture is too homogenous, too smooth, as if it's been beaten in a Kitchen Aid for five minutes, I like to sink my teeth into big chunks of avocado." The complainer got his

wish with the last few we tried. The last Whole Foods dip, Whole Foods Chunky Guacamole (\$3.49 for 12 ounces) was another crowd favorite. "This is amazingly fresh," exploded Bernice.

"Very unadulterated flavor," added Shawn. "I appreciate the dime-sized chunks of avocado," continued Patrick. The group finished off the bowl before moving on to the last two dips, both from Costco.

The previous evening while shopping for the tasting at Costco and heaving in their bulk size packages into my cart, a man stopped me and with a smile, asked me if I liked avocado. "Yes, I do, but I am actually buying these to taste test them," I replied.

"Oh, well, both kinds are great; they taste straight from the avocado," he explained. "I like to mix in a little salsa," he added. "Delicious! This is a good time to be doing this because the Super Bowl sells more avocados than any other time of year," he said. I smiled in agreement and thanked him for his tips.

At the tasting, I informed the group of his comments. Shawn had tried the two types before. "The nice thing about these two is that you can freeze them, and they taste just great," she offered. We dove into the Avomex Avocado Hass Variety (\$4.99), which is a whopping 32 ounces and claims to be made from ten avocados. "This is a good base," said Patrick, "to which I would add tomatoes and salt."

"It is just avocado flavor, nothing else. But it is a cheap price for the amount of avocados that are in there," added Bernice.

The 32-ounce Señor Felix's Guacamole (\$4.85) fared better. "This has huge chunks of avocados; it is saltier and a little onion. I like it better than the last," stated Frank.

Bernice continued, "I would never believe you could buy an avocado dip that tasted this good."







The night continues like this, and it's time to go. I say my good-byes and (write it!) stagger to my gold Honda Accord, enjoying the two moons that are circling above the earth tonight. "I'll drive carefully," I think, and I repeat, "I'm not that drunk." I climb behind the wheel, take a deep breath, and start the engine. The streets in this part of Point Loma are hilly and winding, and I don't know the neighborhood at all. I'll be especially cautious. I crawl out of the parking space, make a U-turn, and head down the winding hill toward Rosecrans. Once there, getting home will be a piece of cake. But the three sisters who weave the cloth of our fate have different things in store for me on this lovely April night. Somewhere between the party and Rosecrans, a lamppost intervenes. A lamppost — not on the sidewalk, but on a center divider in the middle of one of those winding Point Loma streets. The accident happens in slow motion. Or at least it feels that way. An air bag explodes, the Honda slowly, almost gently, tilts on its side, and I find myself looking straight up at the passenger door above me. Hmm, this is interesting, I think.

I undo my seat belt and climb up toward the door, manage to get it open, and climb onto the side of the car. The night sky is luminous. I jump down onto the pavement and am almost enjoying the dream I find myself in. It is 10:30 at night, and a crowd is already forming. I think of Karl Shapiro's poem "Auto Wreck," which describes the feeling of people in the crowds that immediately and inevitably appear, minutes, even seconds, after an accident. ("See, I'm thinking rationally," I tell myself,

"I'm not that drunk.")

I look up, and already the police are here, flashing red and yellow lights piercing the night's serenity. I'm sitting on a curb trying to get my bearings. An officer approaches. He seems very young. This is one of the actualities of aging; cops look younger every year.

"Are you all right?" he asks.

"Yes, I'm fine," I say, not even aware at the time that my knee is badly bruised, and the right answer would have been, "No, I'm hurt, I need to go to the hospital." But who is thinking strategically under these circumstances?

"Can you stand up?" he asks me, and of course I do, intending to show him just how alert and sober I am. But the booze smell emanating from me clearly gives away the game, and he asks me, "How many drinks have you had tonight?"

"Just a couple," I say, underestimating my total consumption by about four to five glasses of Chardonnay.

"Can I ask you to walk along this line?" he says, pointing to a crack in the sidewalk.

Since I've been through this before, I know the routine. This is the field sobriety test to determine whether the officer has probable cause to arrest me on suspicion of driving under the influence. I walk, placing one foot unsteadily in front of the other, feeling shaky and unbalanced. I manage to get about ten feet, swaying from side to side. Next, he stands in front of me, holds up a pencil, moves it left to right in front of my nose, and asks me to follow it with my eyes without moving my head. This seems extraordinarily hard to do. Finally, he asks me to count backwards from 100, subtracting seven each time. I think I'm doing this right, but when I later read the officer's report, he said I began getting it wrong after 93.

Anyway, right after the field sobriety test, he asks me to clasp my hands behind my back, and I feel the cold, unmistakable chill of handcuffs locking closed around my



wrists. The officer escorts me to the police car, lowers my head with his palm as they do in *Law & Order*, and nudges me into the back seat. He climbs behind the wheel and starts the car. He tells me we're going downtown, where I will take a blood alcohol test; I have the choice of a Breathalyzer, a blood test, or a urine test. I vaguely recall from the first time that most lawyers recommend the Breathalyzer because it can be more easily challenged. But as I'm debating the alternatives in my mind, he punches my name into the computer built into the police car (Damn! Crooks don't have a chance these days) and tells me, "I see this is your second arrest."

"Yes," I say, "but the other one was more than seven years ago. I thought you get a fresh start after seven years."

"Let's see," he says, punching data into



the computer. (I wonder what the accident rate is for people who operate computers while driving.) "Today's date is April 2," he says. "It looks like you're 19 days short of seven years. Your last conviction will be seven years ago on April 21."

I feel my stomach sink, and that queasy, empty feeling takes over my midsection. The handcuffs are digging into my wrists behind me, and I'm very conscious of them. When we arrive at the police station, I'm left in the car while the officer files some paperwork. After 10 or 15 minutes, he returns, uncuffs me, and escorts me into a small room where I'm given a Breathalyzer test to determine my blood alcohol content. Twice. Literally for "good measure." Each time, despite my attempt to inhale as much of the room's air before breathing out, I register 0.11%, which is 0.03% over the 0.08% that

defines me as legally impaired. That figure will follow me around for the next year and a half, when one person after another in the drunk driving program I am sentenced to asks, "What did you blow"?

But I'm getting ahead of myself. For

you were "intoxicated," only that your driving was "influenced" by the intake of alcohol or drugs.

So the standard booking routine follows. I give up my wallet, keys, coins, wristwatch, and so on; I am photographed and

now, the 0.11 means that I'm going to spend the night in the drunk tank, and I'm going to be booked for a violation of Section 23152 of the Vehicle Code, "Driving Under the Influence," formerly known as "Driving While Intoxicated." The distinction is noteworthy. The state does not have to prove fingerprinted; I'm taken to a dank and urine-smelling cell in which about a dozen men in various states of intoxication are lying, sprawling, leaning, pacing, sitting, and whining and moaning. There is a pay phone on the wall, and someone is always on it. I find a concrete bench about half the

length of my body and lie down, closing my eyes, hoping to pass out and wake up to find this is only a nightmare. But of course it's not, except metaphorically.

The hours pass slowly, very slowly. Minutes feel like hours, hours like whole days. After a while — God knows how long — my name is called and I'm taken to another holding cell outside a glassed-in office where a woman is interviewing detainees, one after the other. In about an hour, my name is called again and I'm cuffed again, this time to a chair, where I sit while I answer questions about any prescription drugs I need to take, and where I work, and do I have

any health problems, and so on. While the questions are tedious, it feels like something of a relief to just be out of a cell and away from the stench of urine, even though I am handcuffed to a chair. Freedom is relative.

When this is over, I'm taken to another cell (it's now about two in the morning) where there are about a half dozen sleeping or semisleeping guys. Every 15 minutes or so, someone's name is called, and he is escorted from the cell to a small window that is visible from where I sit. At the window he signs some papers, gets his belongings back, and is released into the wee hours of the San Diego

morning. This happens regularly until everyone who was in the cell before me is gone. Then suddenly it stops.

Another hour or so passes, and I call to one

down on the bench and pretend I'm sleeping.

After what seems like days, I discover that Hemingway was right when he (taking his cue from Ecclesiastes) said

of the guards, "How come they've stopped calling names?" I ask.

"The computer's down," he says. "Won't be back up until about 10 a.m. They update it on Sunday mornings." Again, the sinking feeling, the queasiness. I lie "the sun also rises," and it actually is Sunday morning. The hours continue to crawl by until it's finally 10 a.m., and like clockwork, the guard calls my name. I've never been so glad to hear it. By now, of course, I'm sober as a

various documents saying I'll be in court at a certain day and time, get information about where my car is, get my things back, and walk out into the glorious sunlight. It's an absolutely beautiful day. Nature has not noticed my arrest, nor anyone else's. I live only about a mile from the downtown jail, so I decide to walk home. Actually, I don't have much of a choice, since my car is at an auto wrecking yard somewhere.

saint. I sign my name to

After I get home, I look through the papers I've been given and find out just where that junkyard is. When I call them, they tell me I will have to pay daily storage for the car until I get it out of there. First things first. I call my insurance company to report the accident and tell them where the car is so their adjuster can look at it. Then I call a friend and borrow her car to go take a look at mine.

When I arrive at the junkyard, I'm truly astonished. The car — a gold 1994 Honda Accord that served me well — is a total loss. One whole side of it is accordionized, the front is bashed in, the windshield is smashed,

there's scarcely a single square foot of it that is not damaged. Both air bags had deployed and are draped across the front seat looking like spent giant condoms. It's clearly a total loss. So I get my things from the trunk and glove compartment and sign some paper saying that the junkyard can turn the auto over to the insurance company. I really don't recog-

nize the gravity of what has happened and how deeply and widely it will affect my life until the first several days of the next week, when each day my mailbox is stuffed with letters of solicitation from lawyers who specialize in defending drunk drivers. (Okay, let me be politically correct: people who are accused of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs.) In all, I receive more than 30 of these solicitations, but I am very wary of hiring a lawyer at all. After my first arrest, I hired an attorney who did virtually nothing and charged me \$2000 for the privilege of having her represent me. I certainly wasn't going to hire her again. But this is a second offense, and these solicitation

roaded by overly zealous enforcement of the laws. They treat people who have been arrested for DUI like lepers. A rapist or murderer gets more sympathy. You need to come in right away, and I'll give you the best defense possible. I've gotten a lot of people off. I'm the only attorney in San Diego County who really limits his practice to DUI offenses. I've got a book filled with testimonials I can show you. I know you're getting all sorts of letters from lawyers, but most of these guys don't know DUI law from real

organizations like MADD; Breathalyzer experts; insurance companies; state and county officials; and, much to my surprise, the San Diego State University Foundation, a so-called nonprofit organization that runs an alcohol education and counseling program for the county. This is a bigmoney industry, and anyone convicted of drunk driving will contribute a large chunk of his or her assets to it.

When I show up at Mr. DUI's office the next day I find his waiting area packed, filled

Mr. DUI, sounding like he repeats this pitch at least 20 times a day, pauses after he talks about each stage of the proceedings to be expected and asks, "Do you want to hear more?" When I finally say I've heard enough, he slips a contract in front of me that says his total fee, if he's able to plea bargain the case, is \$1500. I thought I had heard the figure of \$900 on the videotape, and I ask him about the lower fee. "That's for first offenses," he says. "Second offenses are much more complicated." I

Mr. DUI tells me that the reason he gets so many people acquitted of DUI charges is that law enforcement officials at all levels make mistakes, and he pores over the files personally, looking for errors that will enable him to successfully either plea bargain the charge to a lesser offense (reckless driving, illegal lane changes, etc.) or get it thrown out altogether. He shows me a phone-book–size volume of letters encased in plastic, many of them handwritten, saying how Mr. DUI

sign the paper and leave him a check for a down payment. This is the last I would see of Mr. DUI until after my case is settled, when I again make a very brief appearance in his wellappointed office to sign a long, complicated document of disclaimers freeing him from any further responsibility in my case. It must require more than a dozen of my signatures or initials on various lines.

The DMV hearing occurs a few weeks after my first visit to Mr. Ticket. He appears at the hearing with me, along with the toxicologist he recommended I hire, who had interviewed me by phone asking how many drinks I had had over how

many hours on that fateful night. Based on what I told him, and on the time between the accident and my taking the Breathalyzer test, he produces a chart showing that my blood alcohol level at the time of the accident could have been below 0.08.

I testify that I did not think I was under the influence when I had the accident — that I had been distracted by some lights in my rearview mirror (the latter was true) and did not see the lamppost. Mr. Ticket makes a motion for dismissal, saying that the state has not produced a preponderance of evidence that shows I was impaired while I was driving. The hearing officer says she needs to study the specifics of the case further, and the hearing is over in about 15 minutes. On the way out, Mr. Ticket and the expert tell me they

thought it had gone very well and that I would probably hear the results within ten days.

I do. My license is suspended for a year.

Okay, I take a deep breath and steel myself for a year of becoming familiar with the San Diego transit system and reliance on friends to get me here and there. I also take refuge in a fact I read somewhere that 90 percent of individuals whose licenses have been suspended for DUI offences continue to drive anyway.

The next step on the DUI ladder is to await news from Mr. DUI about the status of my court case. Unfortunately, the next time I call the law office I learn that Mr. DUI has had a heart attack, that he is recuperating well, but his legal staff is handling all his cases. Within a few weeks, one of these staffers contacts me, and

I meet him in the office. He tells me he has plea bargained the DA's office to waive the prior, meaning that I will plead guilty to driving under the influence and will be sentenced as if this were a first offense.

This sounds great initially, but as more of the legal drama unfolds, it turns out to be pretty much a mirage. That's because no matter what the judge does, the DMV has my case down as a second-offense violation of section 23152 of the Vehicle Code, and there are very specific and unavoidable penalties associated with twotime losers. So I have a day or two of relief when I go before the judge and she finds me guilty and sentences me as follows: Fine: \$1300 (the same amount I was fined for the first conviction, so I guess there is some minimal advantage in waiving the prior); Restitution: It

will be determined if I owe the City of San Diego anything for damaging a lamppost. As it turns out I owe them nothing; the base of the lamppost was solid concrete and showed nary a trace of having demolished my Honda.

The fine and restitution are the least of the penalties. In addition, I am sentenced to enroll in an 18-month DUI program (which includes weekly participation in the program plus weekly attendance at AA meetings), to attend a presentation of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers, and to have my license suspended for 90 days — a moot point, since it has already been suspended for a year by the DMV. (After a year, I will get my license back, but it will be a restricted license. For another year

and a half, I can drive only to and from work and to and from the DUI program. The DMV will not issue an unrestricted license until the program is completed.)

The cost of enrolling in the secondconviction program is \$1500, plus all sorts of extra fees if you need to reschedule a day or take a leave of absence. But these costs pale when measured against the largest financial setback a second DUI will trigger, and that is a huge increase in my automobile insurance rates. Before my second conviction, I had a completely clean record for nearly seven years and was paying a gooddriver rate of \$1634 annually for auto insurance. After the conviction, this expense soars to \$3600. Over a fiveyear period, this night of irresponsible partying will cost me nearly \$10,000 in increased insurance costs alone.

I will spare you the tedious details of various court visits certifying this or that and move first to my attenlot of people — especially among those convicted of driving under the influence — have a built-in bias against this organization, viewing them pretty much as the Women's Christian Temperance Union was viewed during Prohibi-

dance at the MADD meeting, and second, my ongoing experience in the county-mandated second-conviction program. The MADD presentation is a one-time event, but in many ways it is the most effective part of the sentence. A

tion — puritanical, anti-fun types who want all of us bad boys and girls to pay for our sins. After all, MADD is almost single-handedly responsible for transforming the laws in this area from what was basically a slap on the wrist, the equivalent of a speeding ticket, to the major disruption in a person's life that those laws mandate today. Many participants I meet in the DUI program are fond of pointing out that the founder of MADD, Candy Lightner, was convicted of drunk driving. According to the MADD website, this is simply not true.

Since 1991 courts have routinely sentenced drunk drivers to attend a presentation sponsored by MADD. The one I attend is held in a large auditorium near UCSD. When I arrive, I am amazed to find more than 300 people milling about, waiting for the doors to open. It takes nearly 20 minutes to get everyone into the auditorium and seated, and this with the Gestapo-like tactics of a

San Diego police officer who is doing an impersonation of a prison guard. ("Anyone not in that door by seven o'clock will be turned away. You people are here under court order. Keep your mouth shut and your feet moving....") As we enter the auditorium, we must pass a stern guard near a large basket that has a sign saying, "Place donations here; recommended donation \$20." We donate.

When we are finally seated, the same policeman who had herded us in called the group to order. "How many people drove here tonight on a suspended license?" he asks. Everyone looks around. One brave soul far in the back raises his hand. "Well, there's at least one honest person here...I'm going to let

















him leave first." This breaks the tension, and everyone laughs. But not for long.

The presentation consists of a woman and a man, each of whom had lost a child in accidents caused by drunk drivers. These tales are told, not in the abstract, but with a great many photos of these bright, innocent, happy families before the accident, as well as pictures of the accidents themselves. The parents' stories are heartbreaking. It is impossible to hear them without being moved. How awful it feels to realize that nearly every one of us in that auditorium was a potential killer — that instead of hitting a lamppost, I might have flattened a human being.

In the year 2000, the last year for which California Highway Patrol statistics are available. there were 1938 alcoholrelated accidents in San Diego County that resulted in death or injury; 72 of those collisions involved fatalities. In 2000, 83 people died in alcohol-involved collisions in the county. Statewide for that year, there were 21,018 alcohol-related accidents resulting in death or injury, 1094 of them fatal. There has been little variation in these figures for the past five years.

Despite the stricter laws, vigorous enforcement, massive advertising campaigns, and a high degree of public awareness about the dangers of drunk driving, people continue to slip behind the wheel to drive home after a night of drinking. When we're sober we realize that drunk driving is dangerous; but drinking impairs our judgment, and drinkers almost never think they're as drunk as they are. Drinkers constantly underestimate the amount they have had

to drink and constantly overestimate their ability to drive safely.

For example, in the recent David Westerfield murder trial, Brenda van Dam testified that she had had a few beers and several tokes on a joint before going out for the night, then four cranberry vodkas, another beer, and another few tokes on a joint at the bar the night of her daughter's abduction. Then she had some Diet Coke and Red Bull, she said, to sober up. Brenda was the designated driver for her group of friends.

Georgi Di Stefano, the executive director of San Diego State University's Center on Substance Abuse, administers the DUI program I have been sentenced to attend. Di Stefano is a short, ebullient woman who exudes enthusiasm about the work she does. She's been in the field of substance abuse and chemical dependency for more than 20 years and has been clinical director of the DUI program for the SDSU Foundation for the past four. Last year she was appointed executive director as well.

"It's all about raising awareness," she says. "We're not a treatment program, but we do suggest to some people that they enroll in a treatment program. The vast majority of people in our first-offender program really just need basic education to recognize the dangers of drinking and driving and become aware of their own lifestyle issues that maybe put them at risk. For instance, a petite woman goes to Old Town and orders one of those mammoth margaritas and thinks she's fine after drinking it. Because of her body size, that single drink may cause her to be arrested. Also, there's a fallacy and misconception in the community.



People think they can drink without worrying about it as long as their blood alcohol level is below 0.08%. That's incorrect. That's just what's needed for an automatic conviction. But you can be arrested and convicted with a blood alcohol content below that. We have people in here who blew 0.06 or 0.07. The key is, does the arresting officer think your driving was impaired by alcohol."

I ask Di Stefano how many people who go through the firstoffender program end up coming back. "About one-third of those become repeat offenders. They go into the

multiple-conviction program, which is much more intense and long lasting than the first program. That's because there's a much higher percentage of people who have problems with drugs and alcohol in those programs. That's why they become repeat offenders. The multiple-conviction program is geared to have people take a deeper look at their relationship with alcohol or drugs and to put some strong strategies in place to keep themselves and society safe by never drinking and driving. But we tell people all the time that if they have a chemical dependency, it's not

The folklore, widely discussed in the groups, is that the police are much more lenient with women than men. Another explanation may be that fewer women drive while intoxicated.

One major problem with the group sessions is that there is little continuity. People join and leave groups regularly. As anyone who knows anything about group dynamics will tell you, it takes time for a group to bond and feel a sense of trust about its members. Just when that trust begins to develop, three people finish their group sessions and two others are signed up,

and the entire dynamic of the group is changed. Nevertheless, despite the complaints, despite the turnovers, despite the resentment, this group experience has a strong impact on me, as I know it does on some others I meet along the way.

There is Robert (I'll change all the names), who begins hugely overweight and sullen and ends, a year later, 100 pounds lighter, getting hold of his life, quitting drinking altogether, and enrolling in a weightloss program. It is simply astonishing watching Robert become more animated and alive, and thinner and thinner each week. Bruce, a construction worker, finds the humor in every situation and regularly tells hilarious stories about going out to sea in his boat. Bruce seems the most friendly soul among us, until he gets very upset one week when a new participant in the group takes his regular seat near the door. He demands it back. When the newcomer refuses to cede it, Bruce storms out, and I never see him again.

grieving over the breakup of her relationship. "I'll just let God be my boyfriend," she says during one session, and immediately the lyrics of a country and western song emerge whole in my mind. And there's Paul, trying to give up smoking as well as drinking, who talked about the nightmares stimulated by wearing a nicotine patch and who remains steadfast in freeing himself of his addictions, even though he has to deal with the death of a close friend

while he is enrolled in the program.

And there are sadder cases, like José, a young man who is busted for drug dealing while in the program and now faces a second drug conviction. And dark, lost, deeply cynical souls like Mauré, who hardly ever says a word, but during a session on the evening of September 11, 2001, when we all are stunned by the horror of the World Trade Center crumbling, blurts out, "Why should I be upset about

that? It don't affect me."

I ask Georgi Di Stefano if she can show me some of the anonymous group evaluation forms participants fill out as they leave the program. She pulls a batch from her file, and while there are some negative responses, by far the majority are highly favorable. Tears well in her eyes as she reads from one of them, "It's hard to believe I'm saying this, but I'm actually glad this happened to me. It absolutely changed my life. Thank

you so very much." I think, for all the complaining that goes on about it, a lot of participants in the multipleconviction program would say the same thing.

The most difficult and tedious part of my sentence is mandatory attendance for 18 months at AA meetings, which is in addition to the 18 months in the county-run program. I have nothing against AA; in fact, I admire the organization for how it has supported people

and helped them on their journey from alcoholism to recovery. Many people owe their lives to it, and there is probably no other organization in the country that has done so much for public health and awareness of the devastating effects of alcohol on an individual life. It's just not for me.

Those unfamiliar with the scope and breadth of AA might be astonished by the sheer number of AA meetings in San Diego County on any given day. The organization's website (aasandiego.org) lists 54 daily AA meetings, starting at 5:30 a.m. and ending just before midnight. In addition to the meetings you can go to any day of the week, there are other groups that meet just once or twice a week. In all, AA sponsors hundreds of meetings everywhere in the county every day of the year.

If you begin to attend a variety of these meetings, you will notice a paradoxical quality about them.



A lot of these individual qualities have to do with where the meeting is held: in La Jolla and Del Mar you get an upscale crowd, usually well dressed and articulate; in Hillcrest, you'll find lots of openly gay and lesbian participants; downtown, you'll encounter a motley bunch, many of whom look grubby and are literally taking it a day at a time. But the second aspect of AA groups that drives me nuts you will hear the same stories recounted in the same language in each of them. Phrases like "higher power" (often personalized to "my higher power"), "a day at a time," "hit bottom," "these rooms," "fearless inventory," "I was in

denial," and many others punctuate each meeting with the reliability of a metronome. As I listen to one sad story of alcohol abuse and suffering after another, one thought dominates my mind: Don't these people ever get tired of hearing the same thing over and over? Apparently not, for at each meeting someone proudly announces 5 or 10 or 15 or 20 years of sobriety and that they have been coming to meetings all that time and "working the steps."

I suppose I shouldn't carp at an organization that works so well for so many people, but I resent my weekly AA attendance, and if I had some spare bucks at my disposal, I would challenge the state's authority to sentence anyone to a year and a half of religious

instruction. The third step of the famous 12 steps of AA is to turn your will and your life over to God. AA participants are quick to point out that by God they mean God "as you understand Him." One participant tells me that he understands God as AA itself — a Group Of Drunks. Of course, however you define God, it's a religious concept, and our democracy prides itself on the separation of church and state. To be fair, the court does not insist that those convicted of DUI offenses go exclusively to AA. There are other possibilities, such as START and Rational Recovery, neither of which is a religious organization, but these meetings are few and far between compared to the easy availability of

I was surprised to

learn recently that at least some courts agree with me, that AA is a religious activity. A 1996 decision of the New York State Court of Appeals in the case of Griffin v. Coughlin states, "There is no firmer or more settled principle of...jurisprudence than that prohibiting the use of the state's power to force one to profess a religious belief or participate in a religious activity." While AA members insist the organization is not religious but spiritual, this court held that the principles and practice of the 12 steps are religious activities, since "followers are urged to accept the existence of God" and to seek such a God through "prayer, confessing wrongs, and asking for removal of shortcomings." Apparently California courts

around to this view.

I am nearing the end of my sentence and will shortly have my unrestricted license back and once again be driving among you on a regular basis. But of course there's the stigma associated with people who are stupid enough (as I was) to operate a motor vehicle after drinking. Mr. DUI was not altogether exaggerating when he said that we are regarded something like lepers. That stigma made me hesitate about writing this, and certainly about signing it with my real name. But writing about the experience has been cathartic in a way and a sort of penance in another way. I had a lot of misconceptions about drinking and driving before going through this long ordeal, even though, in many ways, I came to

see it not as an ordeal at all but an opportunity. And it's important, I think, to accept responsibility for our actions, however mistaken they may have been. What I did was wrong, dumb, and irresponsible, and to do it twice was unconscionable. But to paraphrase Omar Khyyam, the moving finger moves on after it writes, and all my regret will not cancel half a line. I can promise you, however, that you will not see an article by me about what happens to three-time offenders. ■





wouldn't deny it. He walked. Insufficient evidence.



Mah-jongg's American origins interweave two immigrant cultures — Chinese and Jewish — then separate them by rules, styles, and traditions. What remains is the connection: the camaraderie and the constancy that give the game its glue, whether you're playing with Hong Kong rules or with rules handed down by the National Mah Jongg League in New York.

When articles appeared two years ago in the *New York Times* and the *Wall Street Journal* heralding mah-jongg's resurgence, hats were tipped to the group with whom the game is closely associated: the grandmothers — or "bubbes," as they are known in Yiddish ("It's pronounced BU-bee! Not bubba!" admonishes one player in a 2001 *Jewish Daily Forward* article) — who congregated in postwar living rooms across the country to "bam" and "crak" their way through a gabby afternoon with the girls. These women, now in their 70s and 80s, learned

to play as young mothers, when their children were small.

But the articles weren't just a backward glance to a fading pastime. It was mah-jongg's current allure that made headlines: "Mah jongg takes the 30-somethings by storm," "Gen-X and

Web Spurring a Revival of Mah Jongg," and "Not Your Mother's Mah-Jongg."

"If you had told us five years ago that we'd be sitting around playing this game every Tuesday night, we would have said, 'No way! That's an

old ladies' game!" " offers the attorney, Tara, as she and her four friends shuffle the tiles, facedown, on the extra table that Trophy's has accommodated them with.

An event planner, a speech therapist, two attorneys — one is also a feeonly financial planner — and one stay-at-home mom who "used to be in real estate...now I supervise three kids." Two married, one engaged, and two single, at either end of a decade. So much for stereotypes.

"At the beginning, we played at each other's houses," says the event planner, Heidi. "When I had the baby, we ended up at my house, so I could stay close. Then," she adds with a wink, "my husband kicked us out..."

"He's actually a very nice man," interjects financial planner Julie, who, in her early 30s, is the youngest of the group. As the fifthhand bettor in this game, she wanders the edge of the table, sampling snacks and supplying statistics. "He's also tall, blond, gorgeous..."

"...and now we meet here every Tuesday," Heidi continues, stepping over the spousal praise. "My mom taught us a year ago," she continues. "We're finally good enough that my mother lets us play with her group at the country club."

A San Diego sports bar/restaurant only *seems* a long distance from a Brooklyn tenement. Not much has changed in what bonds mah-jongg players. "I'm sure we talk about sex more than our mothers did," says the recently engaged Penny.

"I don't know, you guys," argues Barbara, the real estate agent. "My mom is pretty frisky. She likes to say, 'Barb, you girls didn't invent anything.'"

What they didn't invent was their love and loyalty to this game and to each other, nor the intensity of their commitment. "I'd play three times a week if I could," says Barb. "Sometimes we play Fridays and Sundays too."

"Now we're addicted," adds Penny, whose ring flashes prettily against the ivory tiles as she grabs someone else's discard and furrows her brow in strategy.

"I'm definitely hooked," Tara says, rearranging tiles on her caddy. "I love the game, but I think it's also about the female connection."

Playing mah-jongg every week gives these women a break from their own busy lives and lets them learn about each other's. When the five of them met — before mah-jongg, marriages, and maternityit took a Jewish singles event to get them together; months would pass without contact. "Now we don't go two weeks without seeing each other," Julie says.

"There's always a problem that someone needs input on," says Heidi, "and everyone has a different suggestion."

"We talk and eat," says Barbara, as she throws back a tile. "Those two things

Anza-Borrego Tile Company

When a friend told me he'd heard of a group playing quarterly mah-jongg tournaments, I assumed it would be made up of the usual suspects.

"Are they Chinese?"

- "Nope."
- "Jewish?"
- "Maybe one."
- "Who are they?"
- "You'll have to come with me and see."

"The summer of '84 was our first tournament," explains Bud, one of the founding members of the facetiously named Anza-Borrego Tile Company. "But we'd been playing a year before that." In 1983, friends from the experimental drama group the Crystal Palace Theater moved from Mission Beach to the desert, where they taught Bud and his wife, Carol, how to play mah-jongg. The "tournaments" started with 13 players, as an informal event in the desert. They liked the idea so much, they decided to play quarterly. Thus, development of Anza-Borrego Tile Company traditions and tournament rules began.

The tournaments are structured around seasons, holidays, food, and peculiar traditions: The year's first tournament, "Winter," celebrates the Asian New Year with Oriental cuisine; the next, Spring, falls on Cinco de Mah-Jongg, with a Mexican fiesta. Summer's Tropical Tiles island theme includes the annual Make-Me-Laugh contest; Fall is complemented by Halloween costumes (optional), Italian feasting, and pumpkin carving for the kids.

"Some of the original 13 are still with us," adds Bud. For the first ten years, the winter or spring tourney was held in Borrego, but despite fond memories of camping out, flying banners, and collecting tarantulas in baby-food jars for trophies, circumstances eventually moved them all to San Diego. The tournament's location alternates among the players -"Whoever's home is big enough" — with the exception of the summer game, which Sugi, another one of the original players, always hosts at her beach house. To date, more than

A hush falls over the table as another game begins and the tiles are divided. Tara recalls an ad that read "Seeking mahj player. No talking." They all laugh,

recalling that it took them four years to find out all five of them had the same middle name: Lynn. What took so long? "We all talk at the same time," Tara says.

"Sometimes we just

like to be quiet so we can really concentrate," Heidi says in a measured tone.

Julie whispers to me, "We used to talk a lot less when we didn't understand the game."

But it's still, after all, a game. "We're all very competitive," Tara tells me as she eyes the others' activity. "And besides, she's taken all of our money." She points to Heidi, this game's win-

ner, who's been known to simultaneously pick tiles, breast-feed, and take business calls.

As the game ends, Penny confesses she was after Barbara's Red Dragon and Tara confirms what she suspected about Heidi's hand. Though it's all friendly and lighthearted, you sense the eagerness to play has as much to do with besting your best friend as it does with securing your suits.

The next game starts and the girls follow the now-familiar steps of setting up — racking the wall, rolling the dice, dealing, turning over tiles. These are the same gestures I will notice when I later visit the Wednesday-morning mahjongg game at the Lawrence Family Jewish Community Center, just a mile and two generations down the road. Wouldn't their mothers be



me the plaque, set against the back of the wooden case. "In honor of our mothers," it reads, listing their mothers' names in alphabetical order. "From the girls." They had one motherdaughter dinner in 1999. With half their mothers longtime mah-jongg players, the next get-together might include an intergenerational game. Though the girls might not be old enough for a mahj cruise, they did spend the day at La Costa recently. "Of course, we brought the game," smiles Tara, who's sorry she has to leave early, but she's got a meeting downtown in 20 minutes.

The four-person game, similar to rummy, is played with 152 tiles (once bamboo, bone, or ivory; now plastic or Plexiglas made to look like bamboo, bone, or ivory) similar in size to dominos, arranged in suits: circles or buttons (dots), Chinese characters (craks), and bamboos (bams), plus dragons and winds, jokers and flowers. The colorful, engraved tiles are drawn and discarded, announced aloud — "one bam," "two crak,""four dot" — until a player completes a winning hand — a certain combination of tiles - and declares "Mah-jongg" (loose if not literal translation: "That's it!").

Well, that's not all of it; this is the way "American" (or "Jewish") mahjongg is played. That combination is provided on the three-panel laminated cards studied at any game where Jewish women, young and old, play mah-jongg today. The rule cards, issued and updated annually by the National Mah Jongg League, arrive every April, as eagerly anticipated as fall fashions. They offer the year's standard hands and winning combinations, organized by suits and status. (By comparison, in Chinese mahjongg — also known as Ma Cheuk and still considered the national game of China — winning hands do not change.)

If you're not Jewish or Chinese, what do you know

from mah-jongg? The game has worked its way into the culture through films and television, but its insider nature leaves even those within the Jewish and Chinese cultures confused. Maybe you're recalling Amy Tan's Joy Luck Club, the book or the movie (1993). At least in that case, the sets matched: Chinese name, Chinese game, Chinese players. A few years before that film's release, the very goyische Jessica Tandy impersonated a Southern Jewish mah-jongg-playing matron in *Driving Miss Daisy* (1989). In the '90s, TV's assorted Jewish characters discussed mah-jongg among themselves, but unless you were Iewish or from New York, how could you make sense of George and Jerry's joking about the game on Sein-

feld? Or Fran Drescher's Queens-nasal foursome playing mahj on The Nanny? Even diehard Woody Allen fans who've committed Annie Hall to memory

might appropriate a punch line — "My mother locked herself in the bathroom and took an overdose of mah-jongg tiles" - without understanding the setup.

The "ancient" Chinese game of mah-jongg — "mah" means flax plant; "jongg" means sparrow dates to the time of Confucius, say some legends.

Historians claim the game a 19th-century invention once reserved for the ruling classes and played only by men. When China became a republic, access to the game opened up, such that in the 1920s American oil executive Joseph Babcock, who became hooked on mah-jongg while in China, did his Yankee duty and pirated the game back home with him, translating the Chinese characters' numerical values for Americans and setting off a game craze that crossed the country. Mah-jongg was played feverishly in the '20s and '30s, but the variety of rules and styles as many as 21 — made it difficult for consistent play. In 1937, an enterprising group of German-Jewish women took out an ad in

the New York Times, inviting interested players to meet. They formed the National Mah Jongg League, the arbiter of rules and regulations, the collector of dues and donations. (Mahjongg is played many ways by many rules. In The Mahjung Manyal, published in 1923 by Henry Snyder, hands do not change annually as they do in Jewish-American mah-jongg; nor do they change in "military" mah-jongg, played by the Ohio Air Force base's Wright-Patterson rules, written in the late '40s.)

What started as a 32-member league now estimates membership at 200,000. Over its 65 years, the nonprofit National Mah Jongg League has donated thousands of dollars to charities and cultivated a Jew-



ish-dominated board of directors and membership (though non-Jewish groups and individuals also belong). In 2000, recognizing the Internet's capacity to fertilize the game's popularity, the organization set up a website. As a result, the game has resonated with a computer-conscious younger generation, whose all-hours on-line play has helped foster a growing trend among older players and new fanatics: mahjongg marathons, tournaments, and cruises.

Roberta and Steve Last sit at desks on opposite sides of their small travel office, Travel Wizard, in La Mesa. Our talk is periodically interrupted by a ringing phone, which cues one of them to pick up the call, while the other continues the conversation. Mahjongg esoterica overlaps with airline reservations in the fluid exchange of longmarried, practiced multitaskers. Both are experienced mah-jongg players and partners in the tournament (and tourism) business; they're used to playing the left-brain-rightbrain symphony. Steve, a mathematician and practicing accountant, learned to play ten years ago; Roberta learned when she was ten years old.

"It's summer in Brooklyn, and we don't know what to do with ourselves. So my girlfriend's mother says to us, 'I'll teach you a game.' We continued to play on and off for years. But then I stopped, and I didn't play again until after I was married. It was a good way to get out at night; I left the kids with Daddy, and my girlfriends and I played at each other's house."

This isn't much different from her mother's generation, women who would have left the kids at home for a night out with the girls. "Except maybe she just walked down two floors or across the street..." Roberta says. "Whereas we get in the car and drive."

I ask Roberta how she picked up the game again. "It was a rainy Saturday

night about ten years ago; we were going to go to the movies with another couple, and we thought, 'No, let's play a game instead. Let's teach the husbands how to play.' At first, they don't want to play mah-jongg; they think it's a woman's game..."

"...Even though," Steve interrupts, "in the Orient it's a man's game..."

"So, we teach the husbands how to play — and, of course, they think they know better than us — but we had a good time. When I heard about the tournaments, I thought it sounded like fun; it was going to be in Palm Springs, so I said to Steven, 'Do you think we should go?' Steven was the only man — all the women were thrilled. So, we go to the Palm Springs tournament in 1992, we have a wonderful time, and, of course, he gets a higher score than I do."

200 individuals have played, with a core group of several dozen who float in and out.

Pat is one of the folks who floated in and stayed. She met Bud when he interviewed her for a job at National University's library. The interview had gone well, "but at the end, he asked me some odd questions. 'Can you cook?' and 'Do you know how to play mah-jongg or are you willing to learn?' I told him I was a very good cook," she says, laughing. "And that my parents played mah-jongg when I was little." Pat was hired.

Soon after, Bud and Carol invited Pat to their home to learn the game. "That was four years ago," she says, as she sets out dovetailed bone and bamboo tiles for the first game of today's tournament. Under a sky threatening rain, 25 players, ranging in age from 15 to 87, gather around card tables. Antique tablecloths with embroidered dragons and black felt swords cover the tables and set the tone for the ancient Chinese tile game.

When I arrive at John and Kalen's home in Lemon Grove, chunky marinara is already simmering on the stove.

Throughout the morning, Kalen will dispatch players to stir her stove-top sauce while she ponders another pung (three identical tiles). For now, coffee and donuts fuel the first of Saturday's three qualifying games; lunchtime will be determined by when the rounds are finished; a potluck buffet will reward the day's play around 5:30. Sunday play will begin at 10:00 with the fourth qualifying game. After a lunch of leftovers and chili, the four top scorers will play a finals round. Whoever wins that game becomes the tournament's champion, "East Wind." Other players will participate in a simultaneous consolation round. The tournament usually ends late Sunday afternoon.

Around 10:30 on this Saturday morning, after some socializing and a few announcements, the folding chairs are filled with veterans and newcomers; everyone is seated and ready to roll dice. As at most card-table games, snacking is everywhere, but this is a smart group. They pace themselves. Close to noon, Sugi's sandwiches surface. Originally they were designed to resemble mah-jongg tiles: open-faced square Hawaiian rolls, slathered with cream cheese, then decorated

"All right, so shut up." "How much did you win?" husband asks wife. "What's your total dollar amount?"

Roberta waves Steve away and takes another call. While she talks about the price of a stateroom, he tries to explain the nuances of the game's tactical maneuvering to a confused listener. "It plays like rummy, but you can call another dead." I nod my head. "In another game, you may know what the other person is playing and know that they're not going to make it, but you can't call them dead." I nod my head again, trying to place rummy. Have I played rummy? "When you call somebody dead, it gives you an advantage, because then you have more picks." "Okay," I say, as we leave rummy and move on to addition. "So if there's 40 tiles left," says Steve, now a math teacher at the chalkboard, "instead of getting onequarter, you get one-third." That I understand. Sort of. "It's more defensive than any other card game I can think of." So much for a group of old ladies chatting while they toss tiles and nosh fruit.

Roberta hangs up the phone and tells me about the 1994 tournament in Newport Beach, when Marjorie Troum approached her and Steve to start a business. "The next thing we knew, we were partners."

Roberta admits it took some time for the tournaments to take hold. "Our smallest group was 10, and our biggest tournament on the cruise was 93. The first in Vegas was 48." Vegas brings them in from all over, Roberta says; it's been a big draw for years. "Connecticut, Florida, quite a bit; there's a group from Arkansas that plays. With September 11, we had a few cancellations, but not too many." She launches into a story about meeting someone she baby-sat in Borough Park 30-odd years ago and then into another tale about two friends who meet again after 40 years. These impromptu reunions are not uncommon. "People talk about it on the Internet: 'Are you going to this tournament?'Are you going? I'll meet you there!' So you get to meet someone you've been playing on-line with for months. This year, we signed up 1000 total people for our seven tourna-

with artichokes, scallions, and black olives to approximate a "season" tile. (Sugi finally stopped beheading the rolls, and now the sandwiches look more like a sandwich.)

"We knew after the first tournament that we needed to be somewhat serious," Bud had explained by phone. "We spent many hours thinking it through and carefully designed it so no one would get blown out of the tournament." (In other versions of mah-jongg, a player can be called "dead" in the first hand, thus ending his/her participation.) "Basically, we follow the rules right out of Snyder-Babcock, but we have had to make up half a dozen extra rules over time."

And those rules are why this group's play is particularly challenging — and, to the outsider, mind-boggling. The double and triple sums assigned to certain tiles and combinations, player's positions, and dice rolls, make for long pauses between games for consultation with a calculator. Unlike the Jewish-American mah-jongg version, this game does not follow a card, and thousands of winning combinations are possible. The merging of points, luck, and tiles brings scoring centerstage. In Snyder, Bud tells me, a hand score can go

as high as six million points. Up until the end, players can move from last to first place with one extremely lucky hand. These winners deserved more than a tarantula for their

"At some point," Carol says between games, "they wanted something fancier, so they moved from critters in jars to jade-colored soapstone sculptures." East Wind, the tile that marks both a position of honor as well as the player who begins the game, is first place. South Wind is second; West, third; and North, fourth. "My favorite is the Dead Sea Squirrels," says Sugi. That's for the person who comes in fifth "because they don't get it quite right..." There are trophies for those who place in the middle and for those with the lowest score: behold the Golden Buddha. "You really have to work hard to get that," Pat snorts. Sugi adds, "We're working on having a trophy for everyone." Another unique aspect of these tournaments is that players accumulate Lifetime Master Points (similar to bridge), which earn special honors, such as designating a particular hand for tournament play.

The unofficial historian, Sugi shows me the Tile Com-

ments. Our mailing list now is over 2000."

When the National Mah Jongg League joined the Internet game world two years ago, there were glitches. "It took 45 minutes to play one game," Roberta reports. "An average game shouldn't take more than 10, 15 minutes." Since that time, on-line play has been streamlined, and, as anticipated, the site has engaged a new audience: the "young and technosavvy," according to the November 2000 New York Times article. This merging of skills — "typing and talking, clicking and picking" — is a perfect match for mah-jongg's sensibilities and for those of the players it attracts. The Internet's success is worldwide, encouraging all manner of play: Chinese or American, against human or computer, with friends from the old neighborhood or folks from the old country.

But Roberta insists that modern technology can't take the place of the game she learned in a Brooklyn tenement. "You have a routine," she says. "I play Tuesday nights and have for at least ten years. We talk about the same things — ah, we had a terrible this...ah, you couldn't believe what happened — it's our venting time, our weekly support group."

I ask Steve how it's different for him. "Look, we're married," he says. "Do you wanna give us a divorce?"

Roberta rolls her eyes and picks up the phone.

"The tournament is more structured," Steve continues. "There's no crosstalk. But at the home games? Women are women..." If he had it his way, Steve would play more like the Asians, where the hands don't change every year.

"This is why guys wear the same shoes, day after day," Roberta tells me, noting the gender split. "And women say, 'I can't wear that again. I gotta change."

"Whaddya mean, ya gotta change?" protests Steve. "Why change?"

"Either way," Roberta adds, "by the end of the year, I've memorized the card..."

"By the end of the month!" Steve says.

"The most important thing," counters Roberta, "is that it makes people think. We get a lot of widows — it gives them something to look forward to. That's where the cruises come in..."

"But," Steve interjects, "instead of just a single person sitting down for lunch by herself..."

"She has her four friends to go with her," Roberta completes the thought. "They're not just going to some foreign port; they're going with a group. It's like continued from page 61

pany's scrapbooks, which travel with her to every tournament. They testify to the group's two decades of good times: five albums of photos, two albums of newsletters, and one album of invitation art, including a Cinco de Mah-Jongg flyer featuring a taco stuffed with mah-jongg tiles.

Despite the shorthand language and knowing exchanges between longtime players, this is a friendly and welcoming group, happy to help an outsider make sense of their esoteric system. Yet though much of the elaborate scoring is set up so that even beginners have a chance to win, this is not a game for dummies. "I think the game is as complicated as chess," Bud says. "But there's just enough chance in mahjongg that your ego doesn't get caught in it, the way it does in chess. You still have one out of four chances to win." Pat concurs: "No matter how good you are or bad you are, there's always the luck factor." Sugi gives it figures: "85 percent skill, 15 percent luck."

As in any game that brings people together, a few percentage points factor in to make it fun. "I love that we don't take ourselves seriously. We chat and tease each other as we play," continues Pat. "I love the beauty of the sets," she points to the vintage sets — some from the '20s and '30s, with elaborately carved bone and bamboo pieces and polished-wood caddies. "It's a visceral pleasure, the clacking of tiles." It's an intellectual pleasure too. "This group is way up there: they have multiple degrees. They're down to earth but smart." She's not kidding: a casual roster of multigenerational résumés reveals professors, scientists, video-game creators, world-class musicians, writers, librarians, illustrators, accountants, systems analysts, and contractors.

So how do you join this club? "It's a lot of neighbors, people from work, friends of friends..." Pat explains. "We invite only people that we think we want to hang out with." And what if, subsequently, you change your mind? "It's like your crazy uncle at the family picnic — it's just part of it. Sometimes we'll spat, but we're tied together by something else." Apparently former lovers and even spouses still get together for mah-jongg. "And we're not particularly polite — most of the players don't take much shit, but they don't give it either."

you're traveling with family."

And, like family, sometimes they can drive you crazy.

"These women!" Roberta says. "They'll go see the show on the cruise, then they'll go back and play a game. They're up till midnight, one o'clock, and up early for breakfast and back at it again."

Do they see a future in mah-jongg with the next

generation? "The younger kids don't appreciate it as much now, but as they get older, and they want some time to be with other adults and sit down and have fun, that's when they'll appreciate it. Some younger people come on the cruises, usually a mother and daughter. Our daughter Andrea, who's 26, we've taught her how to play...and she's teaching her husband."

With several mahjongg-related businesses running concurrently, how do the Lasts stay interested in the game? Perhaps I underestimate the importance of competition. "Listen," Steve says, "we go under the same name on-line when we play. And the women who know us will ask, 'Roberta or Steve? Who's there?' I usually write back, 'It depends. If we win, it's Steve; if we lose, it's Roberta.' "



ter of Dorothy Myerson, whose 1937 booklet, That's It!, considered the definitive instructional manual, set the standards for the National Mah Jongg League. In 1939, Myerson was hired to do mah-jongg demonstrations at Macy's department store in midtown Manhattan; this eventually led to a regular radio show and a Sunday-night slot in television's early years. "My mother was really ahead of her time," Troum tells me over coffee at Nordstrom's café in University Towne Centre. "She was doing a mail-order business for mah-jongg supplies in the '40s!" After Myerson's death in 1971, her daughter took over the business, supplying mah-jongg sets and other related items around world. (She also maintains an affiliation with the Officers Wives Club at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio, and acts as the liaison between the National Mah Jongg League and San Diego mahj-playing groups.) When Troum moved

from New Jersey to Coronado in 1990, she brought her Mah-Jongg East tournaments with her. In 1993, she met Steve and Roberta Last, who sponsored their own tournaments. East and West met again when, at a Newport Beach tournament, Troum asked the couple, "Are you still looking for a partner?" Together they began promoting events, which have grown from 40 in 1993 to 100 in 2002. They also combine forces to organize and sponsor marathon cruises and 20-round tournaments. and you can't be distracted; you have to focus. It may be the one time of the day when you can. And if you win, you're so happy — you might win only 25 cents, but you're so happy!"

A former kindergarten teacher and a mother of four, Troum is convinced that exposure is essential. "If there are young children in the household and they watch their parents play, they want to play. My granddaughter knows how to play." But in her case, the mah-jongg connection might have skipped a generation were it not for the Internet. "Take my daughter. For years she wasn't interested in playing. But now she's hooked; she's on the computer sometimes four or five times a night. The Internet is fabulous.

People are connecting all over the world. And they can meet each other at these tournaments." So far, Troum's not worried about being displaced by the Internet. "I'm just thrilled to still be a part of it!" she says, as she hands me two mahjongg—tile key chains, one of which I mail immediately to my mother.

San Diego's Jewish community is sourced, like most of the local population, from transplants. So tracing the community's mahjongg practice means returning to the American cities where Jews first congregated—New York, Chicago, Detroit, Miami, Los Angeles. It was in these innercity enclaves — and later in the outlying suburban neighborhoods—that Jew-

ish women learned mahjongg, then taught their friends and families. They watched the game flourish in the '40s and '50s, only to send those mahj sets packing when generations stairs to the second floor of the Lawrence Family Jewish Community Center when brewing coffee and layers of perfume point me to the senior center's mahjongg game.

As this familiar stranger tucks the strap back into place, I am struck by the lack of intrusiveness in her intimate gesture and the matter-of-fact way she grooms me — so second nature and maternal it could be my mother standing beside me. Strap secured, she pats me on the shoulder and moves on to another vantage point.

The game confuses me, no matter how much I observe the tiles, plucked

and cupped to hide their elegant, engraved Chinese faces. The elaborate ritual of beginning — the mixing of the tiles (called "table swimming" by Chinese players); the dividing of the tiles into four twotiered walls; the counting off of the requisite 13 tiles; the cross-table exchange of tiles known as "the Charleston" — all this before the first game begins. For practiced players, this do-si-do is swift and subtle, the movement almost dancelike in its give-andtake grace.

"You look familiar," says Sabina, the woman to Kahn's left. "You look like I should know you."

call up your mother on the East Coast," Rita Kahn marvels, "and tell her when you're going to be on-line."

Though he's Jewish, neither his mother nor grandmother played mahjongg, but he did have a friend in high school whose mother played, "and I heard him complain about how long she would play and how much money she would lose." He was curious about the game but didn't pursue it till he heard about the class. I ask him why he thinks more men don't play. "I think it's mainly a cultural thing. Women tend not to play poker and men tend not to knit." He figures it has something to do with women not working when the game was first popular. "Being at home, mah-jongg was something they could play with other women." He doesn't seem to care whether he plays

with men or women, though he admits the conversation might be different. Ultimately, he's most interested in the game: "I like the fact that it requires quite a bit of thought. The hands can be fairly complex, and depending on the circumstances it may be necessary to change the hand you are trying to go for in the middle of a game. As with many games, there is an element of luck, but skill is certainly very important."

Andy and the three women he plays with in class will go on to have a few private lessons with Kahn and then play every



other Tuesday. But the foursome are too new at the game to be among the 32 players who signed up for the center's first mah-jongg tournament in December; maybe this year. (Rita Kahn will offer a nighttime mahjongg class for beginners in February; for information about another tournament in San Diego, see the sidebar on page 56.)

When I ask my mother about her early mah-jongg memories, she, like most of the longtime players I speak to, culls anecdotes that she's affixed to the game the way barnacles are affixed to the hull of a ship.

"It was my entrée," my mother reminisces, as she pulls another foot of packing tape around the edge of a cardboard box. It's the spring of 2001, and she's moving out of her Rancho Bernardo condo, where she's resided since 1978, to live near my eldest sister in Knoxville, Tennessee. Though this east Tennessee college town is not the first place you imagine to be a hotbed of Jewish life — let alone of mah-jongg — Knoxville, it turns out, has a thriving Jewish community, an active Conservative temple of 250 families, and plenty of women who want to learn mah-jongg. ("I can rattle off the names of 40 women in the synagogue who play now or

want to learn," my sister Ellen reports. "My age, your age — even younger, in their 30s.") This will be the fourth time in her adult life that my mother will seek out, locate, attach to, and thrive in a weekly game. It has become her social ticket, and she's been pulling out that stub since she was a newlywed.

"Do you know I started going into labor with Jeff while playing mahj?" (Her firstborn son, my brother, turns 55 next month.) "And I think I finished the game!" At the time, my parents lived in a small town near Indianapolis, and like many young Jewish women new to a community, my mother made her contacts through the temple sisterhood. "At the beginning, I was just a substitute. Then I became a regular. I was 24; everyone was older than I was, probably in their 30s, and much more sophisticated. We played in the afternoons,

once a week. And the luncheons they put on! Two women in particular always hosted the game...they were very competitive. They were both Austrian and had married brothers — I think they were Holocaust survivors. They competed over who could fix the most elegant meal — and these were gourmet lunches, let me tell you."

Ten years and three children later, my parents headed west to Northern California and Marin County, where again my mother made mahi her connective tissue. "Through the temple I got in with a five-handed game — a betting game; every fourth hand someone would sit out. We met once a month — remember those Monday nights, Susie?'

I remember the clatter and the cakes. When I was young, monthly Monday mah-jongg night meant the good china, the big coffee urn, the carefully cut melon, and many desserts, including a pumpkin bundt cake with drooping dollops of cream-cheese frosting dotted with walnut halves. My wandering finger would be met with a quick potch in the tuchas ("Don't touch that cake, Susie!"), so I'd wait till they were bamming and crakking in the living room before I pilfered my piece.

My memories of those games are not unlike what author Hope Edelman (Motherless Daughters) calls "sensory images" in the 1998 film Mah-Jongg: The Tiles That Bind. The awardwinning documentary, which has made the rounds of Jewish film festivals from



San Diego to Boca Raton, chronicles the odd overlap of two cultures that forged this game as a centerpiece for Jewish female leisure life. The half-hour film mixes Chinese with American-Jewish play, the two cultures' scenes intercut and cued by musical contrast, Asian string plucking versus klezmer reed intoning.

As the movie's mahjongg enthusiasts — many of them players for 30, 40, 50 years — explain their "addiction," it becomes clear how often the game has been a response to the times. As one woman notes about her early years of play, "The men were away at war; our social life was nil." They needed something to do with those weekend evenings that didn't involve subway rides into the city. These were mostly middle-class, stay-at-home mothers; the game was often the highlight of their week. Edelman speaks about the mem-

inside the mah-jongg set resting on her lap. She opens the case on camera, breathing in the "plastic and perfume and cigarettes" that she associated with the game as a little girl. Though my mother worked throughout my childhood, as did most of the women she played with, the game's late hours — on a weekday, yet! — didn't exhaust her. Instead, mah-jongg entertained and engaged its players, energizing them. For several hours, everything was suspended but the tinkling of the tiles and the call of the craks.

When my mother retired five years ago, the number of weekly mahjongg games increased. Many an evening I would call her in Rancho Bernardo only to be stopped midsentence. "We're just starting a game, Susie; I'll call you when it's over." It always surprised me when the phone rang after 11:00 p.m.

(this, from a woman who often went to bed at 8:30) and my wide-awake mother kept her promise.

It might have been the tiles that kept her up. In The Tiles That Bind a Chinese woman talks about the pressure points between the thumb and index finger — digits used to turn mahj tiles — and how, in Chinese medicine, they are thought to energize the brain. Another Chinese woman mentions that the sparrow, for which the game is named, is considered an intelligent bird, "and this is a game for intelligent people." When Hope Edelman talks about memories of her mother, who died when Edelman was 14, she speculates on the dearth of outside interests for a wife and mother in the early '60s. "I don't think there were many stimulating challenges for women like my mother. This game might have been a substitute for something more intellectual or academic." Edelman suggests that weekly mahjongg games might have been her mother's only social gathering that didn't involve children.

But the children were watching and listening (and eating). Ask any Jewish man or woman, 25 to 65, about mah-jongg, and out pour the details of some storedaway memory, often fleshed out in five senses: The crashing of upended racks of tiles; the click-clacking of the polished ivory; the cool rectangles, smooth on one side, engraved on the other. The sound of female gossip and giggling, punctuated by bursts of "two crak," "one bam," "three dot." The smell of coffee and cigarettes and perfume — in my case, Shalimar, Albert Nippon, Tigris, and that green-bottled Emeraude Mrs. Kaldor always wore. Next to each player's rack of tiles: a plate of fruit, a napkin of cake crumbs, a small leather change purse whose contents of quarters and dimes, collected at evening's end, totaled a paltry sum that mattered little when compared to what it lent.

"As a little girl my assignment was sticking the fancy toothpicks with the maraschino cherries into the pineapple chunks," Randy recalls. Originally from Brooklyn, Randy, 50, lives in La Jolla now but used to live in Rancho Bernardo. "I started a game 20 years ago, when I was in my 30s. We shared everything in that game — our simchas [celebrations] and our sorrows. It was an anchor; when everything

around was changing, this

stayed the same." The group

played weekly, and though

its members didn't social-

ize outside of the game,

they remained loyal to the

group lo those many years.

"When I moved to La Jolla,

would be a great way to

meet new people." When

she didn't find a game to join, Randy started one herself, by teaching. "They're catching on and getting faster and faster," she says of her students. "But it's not easy: one gal used to come with a bottle of aspirin." (Distressed by the difficulties of a new card's hands, one woman in New York told National Mah Jongg League president Ruth Unger that if she were looking for frustration, she would have stayed home with her husband.)

Randy's hope for mahjongg's future is tentative. "I keep saying to the women at my games, 'We all have daughters; if we don't teach our children, this game is going to die.' I did teach it to my daughter, but it didn't really click. Now she lives in New York, and when she comes home, sometimes she plays with us. I hope she picks it up." I tell her to be patient; it could still happen.



History of Surfing

rover Cleveland, a surfer? Not exactly. In a caricature from a New York newspaper, dated November 13, 1882, the U.S. president is pictured on a cresting wave, his feet balanced in little boats, while an unidentified associate rides a wooden plank alongside him.

The context is lost on Daved Marsh, who owns the vintage piece. But Marsh, a surfing historian, bibliographer, and collector, believes it to be the first example of surfing imagery used in a political cartoon.

Marsh of La Mesa is a lender to an unusual documentary exhibit that currently fills 19 cases in two locations at the SDSU library. It consists of surfing documents - rare books, magazines,

another lender to the exhibit, Keith Maynard Eshelman. The SDSU alumnus has a complete run of Surfer, as well as whole sets of other surfing periodicals from the 1950s and 1960s, including Surfing Illustrated, Peterson's Surfing, and International Surfing.

A charter subscriber to many of these publications, Eshelman says, "I've upgraded almost all my copies. My Surfer volume one, number one, is in real bad shape, but I kept it for nostalgia's sake, even though I've got a nicer duplicate."

Eshelman has also lent surfer movie posters from the same period. There was no formal, professional distribution for these movies, he says. The posters were put on telephone poles, in stores, and on cars. Often, the movies were shown in auditoriums, not commercial theaters. The movie makers appeared at the showings, narrating if there was no soundtrack, and sometimes they signed the posters for their fans.


"The most popular poster — that is, the one that gets the most hits on my website [surfclassics.com] — is for Endless Summer," Eshelman says. "Everybody wants an Endless Summer. The one in the exhibit has the pink and red sunset and silhouettes of the surfers." It sells for \$300-400." But beware, if you're a buyer; reproductions abound.

Eshelman names as a very rare poster Greg Noll's Search for Surf, from 1957. A poster for Noll's Surfing Highlights, from 1958, is another that's scarce. "I don't even have that one in my collection," he says.

Allen Kukel, a third lender to the exhibit, collects early surfing books. His first edition of Tom Blake's 1935 Hawaiian Surfboard, the first book solely devoted to surfing, is valued at \$2500-\$3500, according to bookseller Joe Tabler, formerly owner of Tabler Books in Hillcrest, now exclusively an Internet dealer at surfbooks.com.

Impossible to price (unless he were to sell it) is what Kukel describes as "a Holy Grail type of item" that he has lent to SDSU. It's a 12-page portfolio of surfing photographs, circa 1915. They were taken by A.R. Gurrey of Honolulu from an outrigger canoe. Kukel bought the portfolio on eBay for just a few hundred dollars.

Another exceptional item lent by Kukel to SDSU is a mockup of what was to become John "Doc" Ball's California



Surfriders: A Scrapbook of Surfriding and Beach Stuff (1946). "Doc" Ball was a dentist from the Palos Verdes area, an original member of the Palos Verdes Surfing Club. Like Gurrey, he took early photos of surfers from out on the water. His California Surfriders was the first book about California surfing ever

All these collectors are in their 40s and 50s. All of them are surfers. Marsh, for one, says he began to collect while living in Waikiki in the mid 1980s. "I would surf every morning with all these older people that had great stories. I would paddle out in the morning, ask a question, and then shut up. I realized there was so much I didn't know and that I should know. That got me really into the quest for learning as much about the history as I could.'

Very Low Tides late this week coincide with convenient times of day for tidepooling: Thursday, January 2, at 3:30 p.m. (-1.7 feet), Friday at 4:11 p.m. (-1.5 feet), and Saturday at 4:51 p.m. (-1.2 feet). An Exquisitely Thin Crescent Moon returns to the early evening sky Friday, January 3, with very limited visibility due to its low position over the southwest horizon just as darkness is falling. Saturday's and Sunday's evening moon will be thicker, higher in the sky, and more brilliant.

Recent Chilly Days and Nights only confirm that San Diego's lowest temperatures (according to more than a century of weather records) tend to occur during the month of January. The mean temperature for the month at Lindberg Field is about 55 degrees Fahrenheit. (July's mean is a balmy 70 degrees.) To experience much colder temperatures, journey to the Cuyamacas; -1 and -4 degree readings were once recorded there — the two lowest temperatures ever recorded in the county.

Gray Whale Migration off San Diego County's coast peaks this month. The best view spots from land are high points close to the surf. Aside from the whale-watching overlook at Cabrillo National Monument, try Sunset Cliffs, the vestpocket parks and dead-end streets from Pacific Beach to Scripps Park in La Jolla, various ocean overlooks on the trail system at Torrey Pines State Reserve, the cliffs opposite Carmel Valley Road south of Del Mar, overlooks opposite Lomas Santa Fe Drive in Solana Beach, and various clifftop view points and beach access stairways in Encinitas and Leucadia. Scan the ocean a few hundred yards to a couple of miles out using high-power binoculars. Best times for viewing are about 9 a.m. to noon.



ABOUT THE AUTHOR:

Only child Linda C. Cobb was born in 1946 in Michigan. She was married when she was 21, to an electrical engineer. The couple waited some years to start a family. In 1981, Ms. Cobb became pregnant. Three months later her husband learned that he had leukemia. Two months after his diagnosis, he died. "I never left his side from the day we went to the hospital," Ms. Cobb told a Michigan interviewer. "He was there from the time he was diagnosed. He died in my arms. He was 34." Three weeks after her husband's death, Ms. Cobb suffered a miscarriage.

A year later, Ms. Cobb took in a 15-year-old foster child — David — and started a job as scheduler for a cleaning company. The company offered everything from weekly housekeepers to experts in water and smoke damage. Eventually Ms. Cobb went into partnership with the company's founder. In 1991 she became the company's sole owner.

Almost 15 years after her first husband's death, Ms. Cobb married again. In 1995 the newlyweds moved to Arizona. Ms. Cobb

began a newsletter that focused on tips for cleaning. The newsletter sparked a radio program, and the radio program, in turn, sparked appearances on television, first locally on *Good Morning Arizona*, and then nationally on *The Today Show, Oprah*, and others. Soon, Ms. Cobb's cleaning hints were put between hard covers. Since 2000, three of her books have been on the *New York Times* bestseller list — *Talking Dirty with the Queen of Clean, Talking Dirty Laundry with the Queen of Clean*, and *A Queen for All Seasons*.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR:

"How," I asked Ms. Cobb, "did you learn to do all this?"

"Well," said Ms. Cobb in her vibrant contralto, "as you know, I owned the disaster restoration and cleaning company for 15 years. In those kinds of businesses you use professional chemicals. When David, my son, started working for me, after school and on weekends, I started to assess some of the things that we were using, and I decided I didn't want my employees exposed to some of those things.

"So I started coming up with more natural ways to clean. My mother, the Queen Mum, was way ahead of her time in that she was a big user of baking soda and lemon juice and club soda and borax many, many, many years ago, before it became fashionable to be conscious of what you used in your home.


"To all this, you add constant research. You're always trying to think of better ways to do things, and sometimes you stumble on them. With the Tang in the toilet, I actually was cleaning out a pantry and had this dried-up old hunk of Tang in there that I must have moved from Michigan; why I had it I have no idea. I dumped it out into the toilet just to get rid of it so I could throw the container out and the container would be lighter. When I went back and flushed the toilet, it was spotless. I realized that it was the citric acid that was cleaning it. And I realized, too, what a nice, safe way to clean a toilet and if your dog drinks out of the toilet bowl, the worst thing that happens is he has orange lips. Very safe, Tang is."

Ms. Cobb writes, "Want to know if your freezer has shut off while you've been away? Take a child's ice pop — the ones that come in (continued on page 76)

the clear plastic push-up wrapper — lay it flat to freeze, then prop it against the freezer door. If the freezer goes off while you're away the pop will be hanging over the inside of the door instead of standing straight up. You'll know then that freezer food *isn't* safe to eat."

I asked where Ms. Cobb learned the ice pop trick.

"Living in Arizona where we do now, many of us have freezers in our garage or on our patio. And, of course, if your freezer goes out, you're really in trouble when it's 110 degrees. So it just became a way of trying to keep tabs on that. My neighbors had that happen to them, where their freezer on the patio went out, and they didn't realize it until blood started running out of the freezer onto the patio at about 110 degrees.

"When I was a kid, the Good Humor man used to come around. My mom would get Popsicles from him and put them in the freezer. If she had a Popsicle in there she could tell if it had melted.

"Another great way to tell if your freezer has gone off is to plug in a night light with a red light in it, like a Christmas light, and if the light goes out, you know that your freezer has gone off. Because then you can look for that red light every time you pass the freezer chest in the garage and be sure it's still on."

What, I asked, were some of the most common questions people asked about housekeeping?

"About kid stains and pet stains and hard-water stains. Mothers want to know how to get crayon off of every surface known to man. Because I don't care how many coloring books you give a kid, that kid will still find the table or the wall, or the floor, or whatever. Parents love the fact that they can just spray the crayon with the WD-40 and wipe it away and then wash the wall with a little bit of dish soap."

"Were you a tidy little girl?"

"Yes, I was a very, very tidy little girl. My mother said that even when I was a baby, I quit wetting my diaper at night as a very young child because she thought I just didn't like to be dirty."

I asked Ms. Cobb how her mother regarded the success of the Oueen of Clean.

"My mom is 90 now. We just had a surprise party for her 90th birthday. But she was always proud of me no matter what I did. My mother was my biggest cheering squad. But she's really thrilled by this because she can see it all happening to me on television and read it in the books, and it's nice when I'm traveling and I'm gone, and she sees me, like, on *The Today Show* or on *Oprah* or something, it's like she's going along for the ride. She really, really loves it.

"My mom's been on TV with me here in Arizona. So people recognize her when we go out, and they will ask her, 'Are you the Queen Mother?' She'll say, 'Yes, yes, I am.' If I'm with her she'll introduce me and say, 'This is my daughter, the Queen.'

"I wish my dad was still here. You know, my dad was a big part of my life. He taught me to be a logical thinker. When I was growing up I actually wanted to be a chemical engineer. And at that period of time women didn't go to college to be engineers. You know, we were teachers or secretaries or nurses. So that part of my dream was not realized. But my ability to think logically has served me well over these years, I'll tell you.

"He was a wonderful dad. He raised me to be a person, not to be a girl. He always said, 'You can be anything you want to be,' and I believed him. He was so proud that I was the only kid in my neighborhood who drove a ball through a window. And even though he had to go over and repair the window, he still was proud. It was so funny because he couldn't decide whether he should say to me, 'Now, Linda, you have to be more careful,' or whether he should be all pumped up and brag, 'My daughter just hit a baseball through a window.'"

"Mothers and grandmothers," I said, "used to teach young people, particularly daughters, to cook and clean and wash and iron. But with so many women working outside the home, how do people learn to keep house?"

"This is a big concern and a justifiable one, because when I was growing up mothers were at home, raising their children. And then there was the generation, that I'm ashamed to say I was a part of, where all the parents were out working and the kids were either what they used to call — and probably still do — 'latchkey kids,' or they had

nannies or babysitters or whatever. So there is a generation that has a gap. I was astounded three years ago to go out and do a speech and have a lady actually ask me how to dust.

"It amazes me that so many people do not know how to take care of their homes, even how to cook. And there needs to be somebody like me, you know, that fills that gap for them, and gives them simple, easy, sometimes humorous directions on how they can keep up and take care of things.

"Even if you're a stay-at-home mom now, the kids have school, they have music, they have sports, they have church; there are so many things that nobody really has time to spend hours cleaning.

"There needs to be someone like me that gives them simple, easy, sometimes humorous directions on how they can keep up and take care of things." So I sort of feel like my job is to teach people how to do it, quickly, easily, and safely, so that they can all get done quicker.

"Also, cleaning doesn't have to be drudgery. It really doesn't. If there's something that you absolutely hate, you'll go at it kicking and screaming. For instance, if you're going to clean on a Saturday morning, you want to involve the whole family. If you set that timer on the stove for an hour, everybody

works and does his and her job and when the timer goes off, you're done. Everybody quits and you go do something as a family or the kids get to go with their friends, or whatever. If you know that there's only a certain amount of time that you're going to have to do that, you can cope with it, and you can get done. And it becomes almost like a contest where everybody works faster and harder so that they can get done first. It makes it much easier. And that way, no one person is left at home trying to bear the brunt of the cleaning and everything. And so often that's what happens. The kids are off, Dad goes somewhere, and Mom's there and she's got the laundry, the cleaning, the food to get ready for dinner; so many times you're trying



to cook ahead, so that you have food for the week prepared. And it leaves Mom with nothing but drudgery on Saturday and Sunday."

I wished, I said, that Ms. Cobb would do a book about how to show a maid what one wants done.

"You know," she said, "that's a good idea. Because if you don't know how to clean yourself or how you want your house done, how do you know that they're doing a job right? And if you don't know what chemicals they're using in your home, how do you know if they're safe or not? Normally, when people clean, they're opening sometimes seven containers of cleaning chemicals. And then you wonder, why do the kids have allergies and asthma now when they didn't used to? There are so many more allergies. And they're sort of giving our own homes a case of sick-building syndrome by opening so many chemicals in our house.

'So it's a good idea if you can say to the person who's cleaning for you, 'These are the products that I'd like you to use in my home, and I'd like you to use my own vacuum cleaner because then I know that the dirt is at least my own, and I know where it's been.' You really want to be able to tell the person who's working in your home for you what you expect. You want to make a checklist for the person. This checklist is important, because without this they don't know what you want done and what's more important to you than something else."

Ms. Cobb paused, then said, "I need to make a checklist for a housekeeper that is like the downloadable grocery list on my website. That's an excellent idea. I'm going to make a note of that because I'm always looking for new ideas.

"And," I added, "you should do a book in Spanish for house-

keepers."

"That's funny," Ms. Cobb said, "that you would mention that. Because in a way that's already been done. My books are available in nine languages. The one in Hebrew is just, it's just hysterical. In Japan, these books are very popular. They came over here and shot a 30-minute television show with me about cleaning the home environment. Cleaning and home are extremely, extremely important to them. And my books have done very well there because of that.

"The Spanish version is the most popular. Why that is is because so many of us have Spanish-speaking employees who are cleaning for us. And if you can't speak the language, and you can't give them something in their language to read, it becomes difficult to make it all work out. Some of my biggest fans are actually people who clean for a living. And some of them actually advertise that they clean with 'Oueen of Clean' concoctions!'

"How," I asked, "do you put on a duvet cover?"

Ms. Cobb sighed, "Ah, that really requires two people. If you're trying to put it on yourself, you can't get it in evenly. But if you have two people, like when my husband and I do it, you roll down the top of the duvet cover like you used to roll a pair of nylons if you were going to put them on. Then you put the bottom corners into it and clip them with some clip clothespins. And then start and roll that back up. And that's the best way.

"It is a tedious job, getting the duvet cover on, isn't it?"

"It is, it's very tedious. But when there's two of you, it goes on really fast. It's funny because I just said that the other night; we put our down comforter back on and put a duvet cover over it. And it is tedious, and if there's only one person, it gets in there crooked, and you can never get it straightened up.

"I'm not strong enough," I said, "to shake it out by myself."

"That's the thing. You need another person to shake it down, and every time you make your bed, you really need somebody to stand on the other side and hold it, and you hold it, and you give it a good shaking up, to fluff it back up and get it back into position."

The Queen of Clean travels regularly, on book tours and for television appearances. "What do you do," I asked, "when you first enter a hotel room assigned you?"

"Always, when you go to a hotel, you want to have in the back of your mind that this is a place where people are all the time. They've all been in the same bathroom, they've all been in the same bed, and so you want to use good common sense. You know, if you drop something on the floor — say you drop a pill on the floor — you don't want to pick it up and take it. You want to go ahead and throw it out and get another one.

"The first thing I do is look at the bathroom. I look over the toilet, too, just to be sure it's good and clean. What I look at first is the tub, to see if it's clean and that it doesn't have mold growing in the corners. I look at the floors, to see if when the mop was run over them, there was water slopped up all over the wall, and if there's crud in the corners. Then I go and I look at the pillows to see that they're tucked in properly and that the pillow is covered well, and I check out the sheets. I make sure I have an extra blanket.

You want to look and make sure that the linens are clean. They should be unwrinkled, they should smell fresh. That's important. And the other thing is, you know you really should never pull the bedspread up and use it as another cover up around your face because bedspreads do not get laundered between guests. So you always want to be aware of that, if you're lying on the bed watching TV, lying on top of the pillows, because perhaps five or six people prior to you also did that. If you really are phobic about the sheets, and it really bothers you, in some of the travel catalogs, you can buy little silklike sleeping-bag-type things that you actually sleep in, in the bed. These little bags protect you from the sheets and the blankets and everything.

I turn down the bedspread and pull it down onto the floor, or down to the foot of the bed, and that's why I always ask for an extra blanket, because the blankets are cleaned on a regular basis, as the sheets are. If I'm going to use the glasses, I always turn the hot water on and let the hot water run into the glass and then run over, just to be sure that my glass is clean.

"There have been several occasions when I've gone to a hotel, and I've called downstairs to the desk and said, 'This room is unacceptable, because it's just not clean.' And nobody should feel that they have to stay in a hotel room that's been assigned to them just because it's been assigned to them. If it doesn't suit your needs and it's dirty, then you definitely want to say something.

With book tours, you know, you're constantly in and out of hotels, a different one every night. And you really need to remember that you're the customer, and they're there to please you. And if something doesn't, do not be inhibited about calling down and say-



(continued from page 77) ing, 'You know what, the bathroom in this room is not clean,' or anything that disturbs you. Don't just put up with it. You can just be really, really nice and say, 'I'm sorry, but this bathroom didn't get its best cleaning today. Would you mind moving me to another room?' They're always nice about it. You don't have to call up and scream; as long as you're nice to them, they'll be nice to you."

"If they assigned you the job of cleaning up these cruise ships,'

I said, "on which people have been getting sick, what would you do?"

"I have some thoughts about that. I'm not sure whether just disinfecting with bleach and with health department-approved disinfectants is everything. I really think part of it is the fact that there's so much recirculated air, just like in an airplane; that if one person gets sick, it's so easy to infect many, many more people. So I'm thinking that if they're not doing it, they should clean and disinfect their air-filtration systems and clean and sanitize from top to bottom. And that means bringing in people that know what they're doing and will do it well. Not people who will just come in and give it a quick wipe. Because if you're sanitizing and cleaning all the hard surfaces, that's a really big job.

You need really, really professional cleaners. Not just bringing everybody that works on the ship in and having them start doing it, when some of them never have cleaned anything. So, it's sad. It's a serious problem, and with this new ship that just came in this morning with more infected people, you know, you wonder. It's almost as if something's changed or they're doing something differently or who knows? It's so easy to pick up viruses in environments where there are many people and there's recirculating air. I always cringe every time I hear somebody on the airplane sneezing and coughing

and obviously ill. I feel so sorry for the person, but yet I'm thinking to myself, 'Oh, please don't let me get that,' because you're all breathing that same recirculated air.

With illnesses, you know, even in your own home and in your office you do have to be careful. You can protect yourself by following good common sense. That starts with washing your hands thoroughly, more frequently."

'And singing 'Happy Birthday,' " I said, referring to Ms. Cobb's suggestion that you time your hand-washing by singing your way twice through the Happy Birthday song while you suds your hands.

Yes, indeed. Think about how long it takes you to wash your hands appropriately. And most people simply turn the water on, spritz their fingers under it, and walk out. You really do need to use care. And during cold and flu season, wiping your phone mouthpiece off with Listerine really does help."

Was there a soap that the Queen recommended for hand-

"I'm not a big proponent of the antibacterial soaps and antimicrobial soaps because they're producing super germs, so I think that it's more a case of using hot water and soap and the amount of time that you do it. If you're just spritzing your fingers and getting them wet and not using soap, then you're not getting your hands clean and sanitized. So it's a matter of using the warmest water that you can tolerate on your skin and a good lather of soap and then doing it for the prescribed period of time. I always think you should wash a little ways up your arm, like up under your wrist area and that. Because that's what gets your skin clean and sanitized.

"And fingernails too. Especially in these days of acrylic nails. You know, it never hurts, once a day, to take a nail brush and give your nails a good brushing. I always do before I cook, because if you're going to touch food, it's a good idea to be sure of what you have under your fingernails."

How did the Queen feel about restaurant salad bars?

"It worries me that the shields they have do not come down far enough, and they arrange the food so that you have to keep your head below the shield to get into the salad area. Then you're breathing and sometimes accidentally spitting, if you're talking, onto the food, so I'm not sure it's the best method in the world. but then, even in a restaurant you're at the mercy of whoever is cooking it.'

'Are you a good cook?"

'Yes, I love to cook. My mother is an amazing cook. I love it. In fact, I did Thanksgiving dinner this year, and everybody always says to me, 'Well, you shouldn't do that, it's too much work; you work seven days a week already,' but it's different work. So it's fun. And I really do love to cook."

I suggested that Ms. Cobb's books really served as a sort of mother for people whose mothers did not teach them to keep house.

The Queen agreed. "You know," she said, "that is exactly how I would like people to feel, that I'm their mom or their buddy or their friend, and I'm along on the mission with them. And that I'm not judgmental. Your house only needs to be as clean as you're comfortable with. It doesn't matter what your mother-in-law thinks or your sister or your neighbor; it depends what you think. I'm not going to judge people and tell them how clean their house should be. I'm just there to help them achieve what they want to achieve."

'What did Oprah ask you?"

"Oprah was interested in how to get ink off her pajamas, because she journals. And she had some chocolate spots that she was interested in removing. She is very, very interested in cleaning. But you wouldn't think that. She is very interested in laundry and asked me on the show to be sure and leave her a copy of the book. She was very receptive to it. And you know who else was really interesting to work with was Regis. He comes across kind of crotchety and like a little curmudgeon on the air, but he is such a lovely, nice person. He just could not be nicer. But I have some of my nicest experiences on the Today Show. They are the nicest people. I'm so looking forward to seeing Al since he lost the weight and talking to him. You know how the *Today Show* people come across on the air as such real people? They just all are like that. They're just the nicest people.'

So is the Queen of Clean: the nicest people.



The National Cryptologic Museum, part of the National Security Agency, has loaned the German Air Force Enigma Machine; the three-rotor Enigma was used by the Nazis in World War II to secure messaging. 

A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond • By Jerry Schad



Perched above the San Fernando Valley on one of the more prominent bumps of the Santa Monica Mountains, the Cold War-era Nike missile site at San Vicente Mountain has become a destination for hikers, mountain bikers, and passing drivers maneuvering the unpaved section of famed Mulholland Highway. On occasions when "dirt Mulholland" closes to motor vehicles (likely most of this wet winter season), it can still be used by hikers willing to hoof it a mile or so. You shake off most of the crowds and enjoy an extraordinary view from the mountain itself.

To get to the start, drive west from Interstate 405 near Encino on a paved section of Mulholland Drive. The blacktop ends after 2.1 miles at an intersection where Encino Hills Drive descends north toward the San Fernando Valley, Park along the roadside here, and walk or bike past the sturdy gate, heading steeply up the wide, rutted dirt roadway. The steady ascent takes you to the old Nike missile installation, which is now a popular interpretive site within the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. Between 1956 and 1968, soldiers from the LA96C battalion manned the site, which was part of a continental system of defensive missile-launch sites.

At best, the view from San Vicente Mountain Park includes the Tehachapi Mountains to the north, a distant Pacific Ocean horizon to the southwest, and the urban sprawl of the Los Angeles Basin and San Fernando Valley lapping at the Santa Monica Mountain foothills. The park also serves as a primary trailhead into spacious parcels of undeveloped land to the south: the Mulholland Gateway Park and a spread of canyons and ridges becoming known as the "Big Wild" - 20.000 acres of wilderness and wildlife habitat practically on the edge of the West L.A. metropolis.

accessories from 1700 to 1800 are also on display. The Bancroft Memorial Rose Garden is on the grounds. Rare documents, historical exhibits, books, photographs, and a research library are also part of the complex.

San Diego Aerospace Museum, known for his aviation art and miniature three-dimensional sculptures, Robert Karr also produced artwork for the bands Fleetwood Mac and Cheap Trick in the 1970s. An exhibit of his two- and three-dimensional aircraft nose art sculptures, in addition to his calendar work, book covers, and private commissions, is on view through December.

The U.S. Air Force and the Boeing Corporation have donated a global positioning satellite (GPS) for the permanent "GPS Satellite" exhibit. This GPS is "the only one of its kind on display in the world." Members of the women's flying club the Ninety-Nines have donated personal memorabilia, trophies, flight log books, and photographs for inclusion in "Pacific Air Race"; items on view alternate everv six months to highlight the accomplishments of local women aviators from the six local chapters of the group. Other permanent exhibits include "You're in the Pilot's Seat" and "Global Hawk" (UVA).

The museum offers exhibits of over 65 aircraft — including a replica of the Spirit of St. Louis, a Fokker Scourge (or Fokker Eindecker E-III), a World War I Spad VII, the flight deck of the USS Yorktown, and a Lockheed Blackbird spy plane -1400 scale models, 10,000 aviationrelated items, and memorabilia from the Montgolfier hot-air-balloon era to the Space Age, along with an International Aerospace Hall of Fame. The museum is located in the

Ford Building in the Palisades area. For additional information, call 619-234-8291. (BALBOA PARK)

San Diego County Sheriff's Museum, the 150-year history of the sheriff's department is highlighted at the museum, which is located "just feet away" from the original cobblestone jail site, built in 1850. The museum boasts artifacts, photographs, equipment, uniforms, and vehicles, along with exhibits from each of the departments making up the organization such as crime scene, K-9, court service, detentions, crime lab, bomb squad, and many others. San Diego Model Railroad Museum, what's more fun than model trains? How about Legos and model trains? The "Lego City Exhibit" at the museum features skyscrapers, bridges, people, parks, and operating model trains created by the Southern California Lego Train Club. See the display through December.

The museum celebrates American railroads with "the largest permanent operating model railroad and toy train exhibit" in North America. View four scale-model railroads of the Southwest, the "San Diego County Relief Map" exhibit, and an interactive toy train. There is a multimedia presentation on railroading, an operating railroad semaphore signal, and interpretive displays on railroads and model railroading.

San Diego Natural History Museum, Tyrannosaurus rex — predator or scavenger? Guests use scien-

tific methods to recreate a "crime scene" to determine the meat-eater's guilt or innocence in "T. Rex on Trial." World-renowned paleontologist and T. rex expert Jack Horner weighs in, acting as judge in the case. Complete casts of fossil skeletons of Tyrannosaurus, Allosaurus, and Deinonychus are included in the exhibition. One series of exhibits shows how paleontologists uncover evidence, develop hypotheses, and excavate items at research sites. Guilty orinnocent? Make the call through Sunday, January 5.

The traveling exhibition "California's Native Grandeur: Preserving Vanishing Landscapes" features more than 40 oil paintings of California landscapes from the late 19th and early 20th Centuries by artists whose works inspired early environmentalists. See this show through Sunday, January 5.

An assemblage of museum specimens, rocks, fossils, live plants, and animals tell stories about the region's prehistoric and current habitats in "Natural Treasures: Past and Present." The ongoing exhibition is said to "display old treasures most loved by the community and to introduce new fossils that have never been seen by the public," as well as highlighting the museum's extensive paleontological collections. Visitors will also discover why dinosaur fossils are rare in San Diego (the region was underwater during dinosaur times).

The museum also offers the "giant-screen films" Lost Worlds: Life in the Balance and Ocean Oasis, exploring Mexico's Sea of Cortés and the Baia California Desert. For more information, call 619-232-3821. (BALBOA PARK)

San Dieguito Heritage Museum, the museum offers informative displays on the North County coastal history including Native Americans, early homesteaders, and recent times. as well as photographic collections and archives. Find the museum 561 South Vulcan Avenue; 760-632-9711. (ENCINITAS)

Serra Museum, "Treasures Uncovered: Trade and Exchange at the San Diego Presidio" features artifacts recovered from the Presidio archaeological site, dating to the first European settlement in California (in 1769) when Father Junípero Serra established the Basilica San Diego de Alcalá, "Treasures" in the form of ceramics, religious, and personal goods representing just a fraction of the more than one-half million excavated to date at the Presidio site are on view. See the show through summer.

The museum interprets the Na-

tive American, Spanish, and Mexican periods of San Diego's history and contains Spanish Colonial furnishings, art, and artifacts. It's located at the site of the West Coast's first European settlement, found at 2727 Presidio Drive. 619-297-3258. (PRESIDIO PARK)

Stephen Birch Aquarium-Museum, an aquarium and museum under one roof, the facility is an educational component of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UCSD. Look for 33 tanks containing marine life of the Pacific Northwest, the California coastline, Mexico's Sea of Cortés, and the South Pacific. One highlight is the La Jolla Kelp Tank, a two-story-high tank with giant kelp plants and nearly 30 species of local marine life. The Lynne and Howard Robbins Shark Reef Exhibit features a 13,000-gallon shark tank with black tip, white tip, nurse, and wobbegong sharks.

In "Secrets of the Seahorse." guests explore the unique adaptations and biology of seahorses and their relatives while learning about the current threats to their survival and what can be done to conserve this diminishing creature. The exhibit showcases 13 species of live animals, both local species and those from abroad.

Technology, motion, and illusion combine to create a realistic environment to "challenge and stimulate the mind" in Morphis: Movieride. Morphis is described as "a 20-seat motion theater featuring three ride films: Riding With the Dolphins, The Water Cycle, and Astro-Canyon Space Roller Coaster." Each film is around three minutes long. Tickets are \$4 (in addition to the regular admission fee). Children must be 42 inches tall to ride.

The aquarium is located at 2300 Expedition Way (off North Torrey Pines Road, south of La Iolla Shores Drive). For more information, call 619-534-FISH. (LA JOLLA)

Wells Fargo Bank History Museum, the museum features a working agents' office staffed by guides in period costumes and contains a working telegraph for visitors to send and receive messages. There's an audio-visual theater presenting short films on California and Wells Fargo history; a gold display, part of the collection assembled by Wells Fargo agent Samuel Dorsey at the end of the 1800s; an exhibit of Concord Coach #251, a restored stagecoach built in 1867; and the Davies watch. Beyond Words

Why was the rest of this concert so inert?

ianist Yefim Bronfman, who gave a recital in the La Jolla Chamber Music Society's Piano Series, is a consummate master of keyboard technique. He can play incredibly fast, as in several of Rachmaninoff Preludes, Opus 23,

without ever fumbling, and always shaping the passage work in a cogent way. He can play incredibly slowly, as in the *Largo* of Beethoven's Opus 10, No. 3

Sonata, without ever losing continuity of line. He can play stupendously loudly, as in the outer movements of Prokofiev's Seventh Sonata, without ever pounding, but always with a rich, ringing, blooming tone. He can play with an almost bodiless delicacy, as in the little Scarlatti Sonata he offered as an encore, so quiet it seemed to be coming from somewhere outside Sherwood Auditorium, yet with exquisitely controlled phrasing. With the utmost skill, he brings out inner voices at just the places they are needed, yet always maintaining a balanced texture. His command of flowing lyricism is as impressive as his command of abrupt explosions. No requirement of the most complex pianistic writing seems to be beyond him.

Why, then, was this recital so heavy, so sodden, so monotonous, so boring?

A partial answer, though one that really doesn't get to the heart of the matter, would point to Bronfman's excessive and undifferentiated pedaling. In the Beethoven, for example, the faultlessly executed runs lost their punctual precision and came close to merging into an impressionistic blur. This early sonata (1798) was composed for the fortepiano, and the composer's intentions depend on the more brittle tone and more limited sustaining ability of that ancestor of the modern grand piano. A pianist who seeks and finds in such a score the same kind of sonorities he brings out in Rachmaninoff is not doing justice to Beethoven's musical thought.

Similarly, Prokofiev's Opus 83 Sonata, while it makes copious use of the resources of the modern concert grand, occupies a very different world of sound and expression from the surging, romantic Rachmaninoff Preludes. Its sound world is dry and acidic, not warm and luscious. The savage outbursts in the first movement lose much of their emotional and structural function when

the sustaining pedal gives them ripe resonances. The final movement, a breathtaking, relentlessly motoric toccata, should not be weighty and dense, its acerbic force constantly smoothed out by the pedal. Vladimir Horowitz, to far more

vivid effect, played this movement lightly and exuberantly, like a slightly sour, youthful Beaujolais, not like a plummy Cabernet Sauvignon that has matured in

ne bottle for decades.

Bronfman's manner of pedaling, which is perhaps a more or less unconscious element of his habitual performance language, seemed most at home in the only unfamiliar work on the program, the recent (2000) *Dichotomie* by the Los Angeles Philharmonic's Esa-Pekka Salonen. It was somewhat unfamiliar to Bronfman as well (he played it from the score), which perhaps accounted for the unusual freshness and pointedness of his performance. Its two movements — the jagged, disjunctive "*Mécanisme*" and the turbulent, undulating "*Organisme*" — furnished the pianist with virtuoso challenges he seemed excited about overcoming.

As to the piece itself: even when played with such brilliance and commitment, it seemed to go on considerably too long for the amount of formal and expressive content it supplied. There were no noticeable themes; the harmonies, while often engaging and occasionally lovely, had little distinctive character and no functional significance; the rhythms, while exhibiting an energetic momentum, were repetitive and lacking in incident. As so frequently in this composer's works (and in the music of a number of his contemporary Finnish compatriots), the burden of the musical discourse lay in pure sound and texture.

When Salonen writes in this vein for a large orchestra, he usually manages to sustain interest through the variety and ingenuity of his treatment of instrumental color. The timbres in themselves make up for the paucity of the other musical components. Unfortunately, the piano, for all its many virtues, is relatively colorless in its sound (that's one reason for the instrument's immense versatility), and Salonen's type of musical invention does not leave much opportunity for the astonishing illusion of color created by such truly pianistic composers as Chopin, Ravel,

Mussorgsky, or Messiaen. (Nor, for that matter, is Bronfman himself an outstanding colorist.) If Salonen were to arrange this music for orchestra, it might be quite as attractive as his admirable *Giro* or *Gambit*. But as a piano work, it doesn't quite make it.

Nevertheless, by its very newness, Di-chotomie provided the most stimulating music-making on Bronfman's program — and the question remains, "Why was the rest of this concert, by this phenomenally gifted pianist, so inert?" The standard diagnosis would be that his playing lacks "poetry" — not an inappropriate word, all in all, but perhaps too vague.

Artur Rubinstein, in an interview, played a brief work of Chopin so exquisitely that afterwards the awed interviewer asked him, "How do you do that?" To which Rubinstein replied, in his resonant voice and suave Polish-British accent, "I don't know. I put my hands on the keyboard, and it comes out that way."

If one of the greatest of all pianists cannot find anything more enlightening to say about how he does what he does, should a mere critic try to suggest a slightly better answer? Well, why not? I would say that what makes a performance capture our mind and heart is the performer's profound understanding of why the music takes its particular course at any given moment, his intuitive perception of the meaning that lies within and behind all those formal ar-

rangements of tones. It is not just a matter of emotion plus architecture plus sound (in none of which a pianist of the stature of Bronfman is deficient). It involves the total imaginative experience that is the reason a piece of music exists in the first place, and that experience can be expressed only in the language of the music itself.

Such an understanding cannot be articulated





in words. In fact, pianists who are good at explaining the "poetry" — like Alfred Brendel or Charles Rosen — tend not to have much of it. Some artists — a Rubinstein, a Richter, a Perahia, a Lipatti — have this unsystematizable but crucial quality in full measure. Some don't. Yefim Bronfman, at least at his recent Sherwood Auditorium recital, didn't. ■



San Diego Museum of Art, postwar designs in America were dominated by curvilinear forms inspired by nature. Just how ubiquitous organic form evolved and made its way into almost every facet of American life during the 1940s and 1950s is explored in "Vital Forms: American Art and Design in the Atomic Age, 1940-1960," With more than 265 items, this exhibition organized by the Brooklyn Museum of Art includes painting, sculpture, architectural photography, fashion, textiles, ceramics, jewelry, furniture, glass, toys, and graphic design. The show, closing on Sunday, January 26, boasts paintings by Jackson Pollock and Willem de Kooning, furniture and sculpture by Charles and Ray Eames and Isamu Noguchi, and ceramics by Eva Zeisel, among many other items.

Significant works by the current generation of Mexican artists are included in "Axis Mexico: Common Objects and Cosmopolitan Actions, on view through Sunday, March 9. Beehive

Those tall cans of AquaNet spray are back in the spotlight. As are the gigantic domes of hair, worn by the "Hives," in the Theatre in Old Town's reprise of its 1992 hit show. Beehive celebrates the women singers and "girl groups" of the 1960s. But if you caught only the first half hour, you'd swear something's amiss. The six talented performers parody every song and vo-

calist. As in melodrama they exaggerate gestures and tones, from Lesley Gore to the Supremes (who break up before our eyes) and Patti LaBelle (who, when she sold her heart to the "Junkman," was far more serious than this!). Directed by Paula Kalustian, the production abandons its aura of overkill-silly as the '60s lose innocence. And the

second half includes first-rate solos: especially Renae Mitchell as Aretha Franklin, Lisa Payton-Davis as Tina Turner, and Joy Yandell as Janis Joplin. The show captures some of the texture of the era. Jill K. Mesaros's costumes are a history lesson (the times weren't the only thing "a-changin' " back then; styles made 180-degree turns about every three years). Jasper Grant's four-piece band keeps the evening cruising. To the young, however, Nick Reid's set may require an explanation. What are those big black round thingies all over the place? Phonograph records. The ones with big holes in the center were 45s. And for the generation of the '60s, they were minted currency.

Worth a try.

Boomers

Class is back in session: Intro to Baby Boomers. Born between 1946 and 1964, they're the largest generation in history, they're writing the book on self-obsession, and one turns 50 every seven seconds. Kerry Meads and Vanda Eggington's salute takes musical walks down all manner of memory lanes: historical, sociological, even televisional (at one point the cast blazes through TV theme songs, and mini-bursts of recognition ignite in the audience). The show alternates between nostalgia and hard looks at then (IFK, Vietnam) and now. Backed by a hot four-piece band, the seven-person cast sings snatches of songs. It's as if your time machine is channel surfing. Just as you remember one, the cast does another. The result: waves, at times floods, of memories. Directed by Meads, the briskly paced production boasts accurate period costumes by Jeanne Reith, a set composed of countless logos (from golden arches to Alfred E. "What, Me Worry?" Newman of Mad magazine), and a strong cast. For actual Baby Boomers, the show also includes advice for overcoming the "Big Chill Syndrome." It's lively, funny, and could run forever. Worth a try.





ComedySportz changed its name, but its methods (and madness) remain the same. Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terrible Turks mangled defrocked Priests, while mums and dads yelled insults and grannies waved their handbags"). National Com-

edy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic director Gary Kramer says the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a "challenge match" against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit, rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledged failure, abundantly, then forgot it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian. Worth a try.

Rachel's having such a Christmas Eve-inspired euphoric attack, even the snow outside's probably a nice monster that "will carry us away into a dream." Not long after that observation, she's in the snow, wearing housedress and slippers,

and tumbling through absurdist $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left$ scene after absurdist scene. Rachel, who never worked (and whose only irksome trait was a tendency to talk a ton), finds herself "unsheltered" and learns that life can be "reckless" with some people — everyone she meets, in fact — and that the past can be a nightmare you "wake up to every day." 6th @ Penn Theatre has a lively, provocative antidote for chipper, holiday theater fare. Craig Lucas's comedy-drama recalls Bob Dylan's lyric, "I woke up on the wrong side; daydreaming bout the way things really are.' The very funny production, directed by Kevin Burk, has a game, if uneven cast and features Lisel Gorell-Getz as Rachel, a woman turned outside-in. Whether she's exalting or exhausted, Gorell-Getz is terrific (she runs the entire zodiac of emotions in under two intermissionless hours). So is Lucas's smart, pell-mell script, especially in showing how a single second can change everything and how at-

tempts to turn things back can re-

pel one farther away. Worth a try.



A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv,

making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene-making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but San Diego Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught

had "Team Sports" — two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" - five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough;

I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, has written one of the few brilliant books (Improv) I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art." Worth a try.

Seven MORE Weeks of Greeks!

What a great idea! To reacquaint local audiences with the masterworks of ancient Greek drama. 6th @ Penn offers a series of staged readings, produced by Linda Castro and David Cohen, I caught the first, Euripides' Medea, and it was a huge success. The approach is refreshing. There is no attempt at polished work or choices set in stone. Instead, the

actors treat the text as if this were the first day of rehearsal: the threshold of exploration. They read in a semicircle. There's some movement, a suggestion of costumes, and (re)acting, but the emphasis is on the word and, as in all Greek drama, on an unfolding story at once hair-on-fire irrational and as logical as a courtroom debate. It doesn't take long to see how pertinent and compelling these plays are. An informal discussion follows the reading and admission is free — though 6th @ Penn greatly appreciates donations.

Worth a try.







Linn said that was the final show for the "Christian mafia." He says he and his fellow Carlsbad High bandmates (drummer Carlos Verdugo, bassist Gary Snodgrass) are weighing their first offers for a recording deal.

"Noize Pollution in L.A. has offered to sign us to a record deal and comanage us." Noize Pollution is known for handling the merchandise and street marketing for Linkin Park, U2, the Red Hot Chili Peppers, and Green Day. "Now they want to get into the record business."

Linn said the band is "leaning toward" signing a one-record deal with Noize Pollution over a different offer from Encinitas label Surfdog (which has Brian Setzer, the B-Side Players, and Dan Hicks).

"[Surfdog owner] Dave Kaplan saw us at a party," Linn said in mid-December. "He said, 'I don't want to let a good band slip through my fingers.' But he couldn't give us what we needed in advertising and promotion."

But last week, Linn said the band had a change of heart. "We are really confused about what to do. At first we didn't think Dave had what we wanted, but after talking to him we are at a crossroads." Linn said the Noize Pollution offer was for a one-EP/one-CD commitment. "With Surfdog there is no set limit."

"I was two years old when they broke up," said the Mesa College student. "I don't think it's important being around when the band was around. The music hits you no matter what era you are from. I have been a huge Clash fan since the seventh grade."

Van Aken, who works out of Absolute Tattoos in Clairemont Mesa, said most of the music tattoos he draws are punk related. "I do a lot of Black Flag bars, Dead Kennedy symbols, Social Distortion skeletons, and anarchy signs...I was pissed when I heard he died since it looked like [the Clash] was going to reunite for their induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame."

The Clash will be inducted March 10 in New

York.

"When Jerry Garcia died, we did a bunch of Deadhead stuff," said Don Bishop, tattoo artist with Larry Riggs Tattoo of Escondido. "My uncle [owner Riggs] got a lot of requests for John Lennon when he was killed."

He said requests for music tats at his shop are less punk oriented.

"I just did a Weezer W and a Godsmack logo. The other day a guy asked for the Led Zeppelin guy with wings. It was the logo they used for their Swan Song label."

Oceanside skin artist Chris Earnhart has photos of the Sinatra and Ozzy tattoos he created. He said he hadn't yet been asked to do a Clash logo since the news of Strummer's death was only a day old.

day old.
"I think it was too close to Christmas. Maybe in a couple of weeks people will

ask for it."

Earnhart, who works at About Face Tattoo, said the last time death triggered immediate ink requests was when race car driver Dale Earnhardt crashed. "I got four requests for those."

But he said he has drawn a permanent skin salute to the Clash, a tribute to the photograph of Clash member Paul Simonon smashing his bass. It appeared on the cover of the Clash's 1979 London Calling album. "I just read in Q [British music magazine] that that shot was the greatest rock photograph of all time."

Chuck Weiss, who works at Fallbrook's Backstage Records, proudly wears another *London Calling* tattoo. He said he also heard that that photo was named best rock photo ever.

"I don't know if it was the best ever, but I think it's right up there with Johnny Cash flipping off the camera."

sharing the two boards that we brought with us on tour. At about 11:00 I noticed my two brothers running around yelling and motioning for me to come to shore.'

The band's van had disappeared from its parking spot, loaded with equipment, clothes, wallets, IDs, cash, and phone.

"We were pissed. How could we have been ripped off among such pleasant surroundings?

"We immediately called the police from the lifeguard tower.... A guy on the beach gave us \$40.

Rizzudo managed to make their gig, playing with equipment borrowed from one of the evening's other acts, Dropscience.

On the day the band was preparing to fly home, police contacted them to say they'd found Rizzudo's van parked at an apartment complex in Point Loma. The keys were still in the vehicle. Canceling their departure, they retrieved the van along with some of their equipment (including half of Seth's drum kit).

Still missing are two vintage guitars — a 1974 Rickenbacker 4001 bass guitar and a 1970s Epiphone



URL watching — Clear Channel Sucks

www.clearchannelsucks.org According to the site's homepage, Clear Channel owns over 1200 radio stations and 37 television stations, while Clear Channel Entertainment (under the business name SFX) runs over 200 U.S. concert venues. This monopolization became possible after the Telecommunications Act of 1996 was passed, which reduced the limits on how many stations any one broadcast group could own.

This powerful company has grown unchecked, using their monopoly to control the entire music industry, warns the homepage. "If you find this alarming, ClearChannelSucks.org is the place for you."

Launched in August 2002, much of the site's content comes from newspaper and website articles. An August 2002 piece by Eric Boehlert (first posted at Salon.com) entitled 'Radio's Titan Hits the Skids" details the \$8 billion



company's recent stock problems (Clear Channel's stock lost 25 percent of its value in August after radio division chief Randy Michaels stepped down), as well as the Spanish Broadcasting System lawsuit, which is suing over alleged antitrust violations.

Clint Sharp, the site's operator, wrote to me via email, "I am a Republican, in fact I voted straight down party lines today; however, I am in favor of government overseeing industries which affect what we see and hear.'

Sharp says the Arkansasbased site has had over 296,000 hits to date and that the hardest aspect of maintaining the website is keeping up with the latest news. When asked if he is familiar with Clear Channel's

recent activities in San Diego, he replied, "Only about their buying of Mexican stations...[which exceeds] the FCC limits.

The FCC (Federal Communications Commission) still limits how many U.S. businesses can be owned by one corporation.

"Rumors have it that they are broadcasting outside of their license limits from Mexico, but the Mexican government simply chooses to ignore it. In my opinion, their practices in San Diego are shady and outside the spirit of the law and regulations at best.

Sharp believes there's little chance he'll be sued by Clear Channel.

'We feel there is a good amount of legal precedent now for sites like ours.

Sucks500.com has had two domains lockheedmartinsucks.com and

michaelbloombergsucks.com enter into arbitration by people who felt like their trademarks were being infringed upon. They [the sites] were successful on both occasions at keeping their domain. Bally's Fitness sued the owner of

ballysfitnesssucks.com in federal court for trademark infringement and lost. We are not making money off this site or attempting to dilute Clear Channel's trademark in any way.'

By clicking on "What Can I Do," site visitors are encouraged to "find out which stations in your area are Clear Channel stations. Then stop listening to those stations." Sharp particularly

urges support for Senator Russell Feingold's Competition in Radio and Concert Industries Act, which he put forward in June. The act seeks to put a freeze on Clear Channel's monopolization of the radio and concert industries and bans anticompetitive behavior (with the penalty being revocation of radio broadcast licenses).

The Best Raves Have No Flyer

"I made out with a girl for the first time on E."

went to my first rave in the post-disco, preecstasy era," says thirtysomething Pat Lusier, who promoted teenage dances in North Park and University Heights from 1983 through 1990. "Back then, the music was called

'electronica' and the fashion was parachute pants and moussemountain hair. All you needed was five bucks and a black-andwhite flyer with hand-drawn

directions...that got you into a cow field with a few hundred other kids, where they'd have a generator on a flatbed truck powering the turntables and speakers."

Early rave music was limited to Kraftwerk ("Autobahn"), Soft Cell ("Tainted Love"), Gary Numan ("Cars"), and Tangerine Dream ("Betrayal" from the film *Sorcerer*), playing through skyscraper-sized Ampeg speaker cabinets. "I'd say the usual drug of choice was Quaaludes. One laser beam focused on a mirror ball was the apex of a high-tech light show."

By the time the term "rave" was coined, synthesized dance music was dubbed "house' hybrid songs that change with every new spin. This freeform DJ-created dance groove was first called "house" in the mid-'80s, many say in reference to the music being played at a Chicago club called the Warehouse, but soon all mixes created for a particular venue were being called "house." Less improvisational and more mathematically precise is "techno" music - songs that are "anchored by a reverberating beat and [use] rhythm as a hypnotic tool," explains Oceanside DJ Peter Z. "The music has a high concentration of bass in the forefront, with everything pumped up to a fast repeating beat, around 115 bpm [beats per minute] on up to 300 bpm. Songs programmed at 120 bpm create a trancelike effect because that's the rate of your average heartbeat.'

Peter Z explains that there are over a dozen subcategories of techno. "Acid house has a lot of squeaks and samples, all stacked to play simultaneously. A synthesizer like a Roland 303 is good for mixing different layers and pitches that way, and what comes out is called a 'funky worm' sound...very liquid. Trance is slow and steady,

very melodic and repetitive, to create a hypnotizing effect. Breakbeat uses sped-up hip-hop and reggae samples, and it's great for getting the crowd moving, but it has no hypnotic qualities. Jungle is about percussion...bongos and drums

and layers of chanting in the background. Darkside is mostly minor chords, like a horror movie soundtrack.

"Hardcore is basically a speed-metal tune treated with a beat-inducer like a TR-909 drum machine. When you advertise hardcore, it brings a lot of heavy metal and industrial fans into the rave fold and makes them feel at home with us. Gabba is an extreme kind of hardcore, played fast with the bass so low [that] the walls rattle and your bones shake...it can run up to 400 or 500 bpm, which some people think is dangerous. I've heard stories about how gabba, along with flashing strobe lights, can actually give people seizures."

"I had to stop promoting dances eventually," says Lusier. "Once newspapers started talking about kids on drugs at raves, it got impossible to get permits from the city, and then all the over-21 bars decided they wanted a piece of the action."

Drugs at rave parties were specifically referred to in a recent Congressional amendment to the Controlled Substances Act of 1970, a collection of federal laws intended to prevent illegal manufacturing and distribution of drugs. The new legislation is worded in a way that seems to hold rave promoters legally responsible for drug use at their events. Approved by the Senate and the House of Representative on February 14, 2002, Congressional bill HR 3782 features a section titled "Promoters of Drug-Oriented Entertainment: Section 416A (21 USC 856)" that reads, in part, "Whoever knowingly promotes any rave, dance, music, or other entertainment event, that takes place under circumstances where the promoter knows or reasonably ought to know that a controlled substance will be used or distributed in violation of Federal law or the law of the place were the event is held, shall be fined under title 18, United States Code, or imprisoned

for not more than nine years, or both."

"The best raves have no flyer," says George Miranda, a socal-raves.org subscriber who answered a query I had posted. Miranda's favorite rave was one where only 300 people attended — Starfall-II held in the Mojave Desert in November 2001. "It's a bigger business now. More people, more parties, more famous DJs, fewer genuine people."

I ask Miranda about his average cost for a night out.

"To a mainstream 'massive,' about \$40 for a ticket, \$20 gas, \$10 parking, \$20 in water. To smaller local events, about \$10 for admission, \$5 gas, and \$10 in water."

Miranda says he attends one or two raves each month, though he hears about "at least a dozen," and rare are the events that are shut down early due to noise complaints or drug raids. "Only when it's fewer than 500 people. Scrutiny for smaller events seems to be much tighter."

Holly Bergen contacts me through the socalraves site and says her costs per rave vary. "As far as massives, I'll spend up to \$35 to \$50 on the rave itself...and they're usually up to two hours away so, with the price of gas going up, it can get a little hefty. Plus glowsticks, gear, drinks."

Another socal-raves list member, DJ Jeff K, tells me, "Go to a local record store like Grooveriders in Sherman Oaks [to find flyers]. I attend raves or clubs every single day except Sun-

day and Monday.

He says the best rave he's ever attended was March Madness, at the Orion Events Center in L.A. on March 30. "The music was off the hook all night...the vibe was intense, and a lot of my friends were there."

While putting this article together, I attended two raves in spring 2002. On March 30, I was at a frat house party in Vista I found out about through a flyer (\$5 admission — "All styles of music...won't get busted, call...for the 411, peace"), and then on April 10 I checked out a Wednesday night public rave — Code Red at Club Xanth on 30th Street (\$10 cover). Fashion protocol was consistent at both events: oversized T-shirts were everywhere, though many guys shed these and went bare-chested after the first few hours of dancing. A majority of the girls wore their hair short, often in barrettes or kiddie pigtails. Babydoll ruffled dresses and cut-off Ts were common, as well as people sucking on baby pacifiers. I saw at least a dozen girls carrying stuffed animals and licking giant lollipops.

MDMA ("ecstasy" or "E") tops the chemical chart as the preferred drug for ravers, and the most common fashion accessories are pacifiers, and also face masks treated with menthol rubs like Icy Hot or Vicks VapoRub. Ecstasy users say pacifiers keep their teeth from grinding together and menthol rubs sharpen the buzz. In its pure form, MDMA is a white crystalline powder, but

the form sold at raves is usually a pill with a picture stamped into its surface commonly a cartoon character like the Tasmanian Devil or Kenny from South Park, or symbols like hearts, clouds, and lightning bolts. "Brand" names include Green Nipples, Green Clovers, Pink Turbo, and White. Ecstasy tablets come primarily from Western Europe, where they can be purchased for around a dollar each. By the time they reach America, they regularly sell for between \$10 and \$45 per dose. MDMA is sometimes cut

with amphetamines, baking powder, or caffeine pills. At the parties I attended, I saw various pills selling for between \$10 and \$20. Ecstasy can be swallowed, snorted, or injected, but the effects last longest when swallowed. Users on ecstasy describe the phases of their high as "rolling" or "dropping." The initial rush

can be accompanied by exhilaration and a tingling feeling like "butterflies" in the stomach, with the high lasting anywhere from four to six hours. Skin sensitivity is heightened, which is why people at raves are constantly seen touching, giving each other backrubs, and bumping and grinding on the dance floor.

"E is the ultimate aphrodisiac," purrs one young lady in Cindy Brady pigtails who overhears me asking someone about ecstasy at the party in Vista. "It breaks down barriers and makes you drop your inhibitions, so you feel at one with everything and everyone. I made out with a girl for the

first time on E," she says, "and, until I came down, I thought I was in love with her! I found out later she was just trying to get me to buy more E from her, but, wow, we had an awesome time before I found out she was a pro [dealer]."

Others told me about their own favorite things to do while on ecstasy: "Dancing and jumping up and down makes you feel weightless."

"Touching and being touched feels magical, even if it's someone just blowing air into your face or your hair through a straw." (This explains why I see so many people with straws in their mouths.)

"It's incredible to fall back and have someone catch you and slowly lift you back up...feels like slow motion."

"Chewing hard candy, especially Wint-O-Green Lifesavers, because they make little flashing sparks in your mouth!"

According to the MDMA FAQ page at www.narcononstonehawk.com, ecstasy can cause "hallucinations, chills, sweating, increases in body temperature, tremors, involuntary teeth clenching, muscle cramping, and blurred vision. Ecstasy users also report aftereffects of anxiety, paranoia, and depression. An ecstasy overdose is characterized by high blood pressure, faintness, panic attacks, and, in more severe cases, loss of consciousness, seizures, and a drastic rise in body temperature. Ecstasy overdoses can be fatal, as they may result in heart failure or extreme heat stroke."

DMT (dimethyl tryptamine, a powerful hallucinogen, usually sniffed or smoked), GHB (gammahydroxy butyric acid, a sedative usually taken in pill form), and LSD can be found at many raves (I was offered several types of acid at the last rave I attended) and nitrous oxide (laughing gas) administered with portable lighter-sized onehit refillable canisters (available at area adult bookstores and smoke shops) have become popular. Hard drugs have also moved into the scene, including crystal meth and even heroin. "Flipping" is taking a combination of ecstasy and another drug. Some popular flips: candy flipping (LSD and E), elephant flipping (PCP and E), hippie flipping ('shrooms and E), and kitty flipping (ketamine and E). However, many people I spoke with, in person and online, stress that drugs are frowned on and discouraged by many ravers.

Holly Bergen at socal-raves doesn't consider drugs to be a factor in what makes for a good rave. She brings up a credo mentioned often by ravers -PLUR — which stands for peace, love, unity, and respect. 'As the rave scene begins to become more mainstream, people tend to show up for the wrong reasons. A couple years ago it was mostly about the positive atmosphere and being able to unify and have a great time dancing all night. However, many people want to view raves as an excuse to use drugs, and that's not what it is either. The music is an adrenaline rush in itself, and I think people need to be open-minded and learn about the music and culture before making quick assumptions, because PLUR is still alive." ■

Cheerful Amoeba

The staff, best as I can remember the lot, are crusty and knowledgeable, and something good is always on the box.

ran into my friend Steve Silberman (not to be confused with Bach's friend, the 18th-century master keyboard maker Gottlieb Silbermann). Steve is *Wired* magazine's star writer, and there he was, right on the corner of 5th Avenue and

11th Street in New York City's West Village, talking on his cell phone, doubtless a matter of some importance as he had his business face on.

We share a number of interests, but none so much as music, jazz in particular, and Steve had made some *finds* on his visit to New York, principally, he told me with enthusiasm, an early-'30s collection of sides by Lee Konitz and Teddy Charles (and with the young Miles Davis aboard a couple) called *Ezzthetic*. I was unimpressed, having seen the disc around and having

owned it at various points. Steve was impressed that I was unimpressed. Steve was also anxious that I listen to a recent release by a pianist named Marc Copland, solo piano, on a difficult-to-find

French label. And then the conversation turned to record stores, i.e., which were the best ones, there in New York, and in the world.

Well, naturally enough, a good deal depends on what you're looking for, in the way of music and in a record store. Steve, for instance, would be chiefly interested in jazz, and after that, I'm not sure; probably world music. Me, I'd add classical, in fact, I'd probably bump it to the front and add on blues, country, R&B, and, although it doesn't exist as a category in any music store I've yet visited, "Curiosities," which can crop up in any section at all, if you know what I mean.

New York has at least two excellent Tower outlets, one on Broadway downtown, a couple of blocks north of Bleecker, and an excellent midtown store on 66th and Broadway, right around the corner from Leonard Bernstein Drive, by Lin-

coln Center. I've done some serious damage at both places and at the downtown Tower scratched an itch I've had for quite some time when I came up with Volume 1 of the *Great Jazz Trio* (Hank Jones, Ron Carter, and Tony

Williams) at the Village Vanguard, a February date in 1977 and a Japanese import. What does it feel like to scratch an itch that you've had for a long, long time? Go-o-o-o-o-o-o-o-o.d. But I shall address the pleasures of extensive sleuthing on another occasion.

I also went down to J&R Records in the Financial District, not far from where the Twin Towers formerly stood. I must say their stock, formerly excellent, has diminished noticeably.

Whether that's a post-9/11 phenomenon I can't say, but it was disappointing. And when I headed uptown to check out the Old Instrument Collection at the

Metropolitan, I discovered that the BMV, up there on E. 86th, was no longer. A pity; that was a good 'un. And then, at

the Metropolitan I was informed that the Historic Instrument room was closed, just that day. BLIMEY!

Now. Steve, who travels a fair bit for Wired.

told me one of the best music stores on earth—at least that part of the earth with which he is thus far acquainted—is in the unlikely city of Helsinki. Helsinki, Finland, that is. Now, I have never been to Helsinki myself, but I've known Steve for 20 years and don't doubt his word. I believe he said that particular shop—which is no doubt very famous in that particular town, should you find yourself there—was strong in jazz and world music. I wouldn't be at all surprised if it were first-rate in the classical

department as well, given the culture.

Interestingly, when Steve, who is gregarious, told one of the Finnish shop clerks that he was from San Francisco, the clerk first gasped, then intoned reverentially, "Amoeba." As well he might have done. Amoeba has two stores in the

Bay Area, one near the foot of Haight Street in San Francisco and one on Telegraph Avenue in Berkeley; two vibrant, occasionally disgusting shopping streets. The Amoeba in S.F. is the newer and larger of the two; in fact, it is the West Coast's largest independent record store with over 250,000 titles on CD, LP, and tape, including plenty of hard-to-find imports and out-of-print records. Unlike Tower or Virgin, it's new and used, and that's what makes it so good. The place used to be a bowling alley, a Rock&Bowl joint, and it's cavernous. The people who work there are alert and knowledgeable, and since they're

customarily cheerful and helpful, it's probably a

good place to work, at least preferable to the chains, I should imagine. And I, for one, always prefer to patronize independents, as opposed to chains. But, having said that, San Francisco, civilized place that it is (or likes to think it is), has an excellent Tower outlet on Columbus and Bay, near Fisherman's Wharf, and a good Virgin right downtown at Market and Stockton; also a Borders nearby, off Union Square,

has a good music department. But Amoeba is really a super-treat, which is why they're gasping all the way over in Helsinki about it.

Biggest does not always mean best, although Amoeba is tough to beat. Down the block from Amoeba, or down three blocks, is a neat little used CD/record shop called Recycled Records, which couldn't have been very pleased after 25 years or so of existence to see a monster competitor open down the street but has managed to survive in spite of it all and continues to maintain ample stock, especially in rock and pop vinyl. If my man Iron Mike is at the front counter, you'll enjoy some playful attitude as well.

Older still is Jack's Record Cellar at 254 Scott,

just off Page Street, about a 15-minute walk from Recycled in the Lower Haight. I don't know *how* long that place has been around, but, if I'm not mistaken, it appears in one of Kerouac's novels. Kenneth Rexroth, whom I've written about in this column recently, lived upstairs from Jack's

for several years. It's got some authentic, old-timey bona fides, does Jack's. And it's an almost exclusively vinyl joint: jazz, R&B, blues, and one of the best collections of 78s on the West Coast. The staff, as near as I can remember the lot, are crusty and knowledgeable, and something good is always on the box. One of the treasures I picked up there years ago was a collection of George Hall's Hotel Society music. Bet you never heard of George Hall. Well, stick

around Jack's, and you'll be turned on to a world of stuff you never knew about.

And if you enjoy crust and vinyl and jazz, check out Tom Madden's Jazz Quarter in the Sunset on 19th between Irving and Lincoln Way, next to a vacuum-cleaner repair shop - or perhaps a new tenant has moved in. Regardless, no one in San Francisco knows more about jazz or what's happening around town. Madden has more CDs than Jack's, but it's still a vinyl place and, but for a few CDs, all used. I would be abashed to admit just how much knowledge Mr. Madden has passed along to me; that is, simply spending a half hour in there and listening over the years. On my most recent visit he put me on to an excellent tenor sax player named Michael Hashim and a disc called Multi-Coloured Blue, a series of Billy Strayhorn compositions, with a band including the two wonderfully talented Washingtons: Kenny on drums, Peter on bass.

Oh, and if it's vinyl you're gaga for, the mother of all used vinyl emporia is just across the Bay in Mill Valley, at a place called Village Music. Of course, that's if you still have anything green left in your wallet.

Back to New York, then across the ocean to Europe next week. ■

Ten years ago, the Reverend Horton Heat seemed to have a refreshing new take on rockabilly, dropping the genre's Stray Cats-style nostalgia in favor of a harderedged sound and a sarcastic, Generation X sense of humor. That worked perfectly in the early days when the singer/guitarist and his band of the same name were signed to Sub Pop Records, home of all things hard-edged, sarcastic, and Generation X. Back then, the Reverend was poised to create a hybrid of Americana and grunge. Today. RHH doesn't look so revolutionary. In fact, the Reverend has become such an institution he practically deserves his own theater in Branson, Missouri. The main reason for this is simply that the band has a reputation for kicking all kind of ass in concert. The Reverend recognizes this, and that's why his next release will be a live album, due sometime this year.

As for the studio albums: Reverend long ago gave up any notion he ever had about modernizing rockabilly. Instead, he has

firmly established his style — expert Chuck Berry-meets-Link Wray-meets-Dick Dalemeets-punk rock guitars: comical songs about cars, booze, and women; absurdly sleazy double entendres in the lyrics — and worked within its limitations. That's the strategy that has built the careers of gener ations of rockabilly and roots players. It works pretty well, but it does have a way of making each new album sound just like the



one before it. On last year's (2002) Lucky 7, even the Reverend seems bored with the process — and, presumably, of the frat-boy following that lets him get away with anything as long as he dishes out the sex jokes.






Today, R&B and soul lie in the hands of goldplated acts like N'Sync, the Backstreet Boys, or Michael Bolton — vocalists who pummel the emotion out of every word by oversinging. It's a cheap trick and a poor substitute for the real thing. Even so, there is a huge market for this sort of high-gloss artifice. Vote them all off the island, I say, and pop music would be a better place.

Then there is Etta James, one of a handful of survivors from the old school. She was a role model for almost every female soul singer whose career began in the '60s. James's voice had a raw gospel power not unknown to the pop records of the 1950s, but her songwriting influenced much of the popular music in the decades to come. At 16, James sang about the utopian boy-girl

love that Phil Spector would capitalize on with his all-girl groups, Later, James began to allude to the men who had been abusive in her life, singling them out in her ironic blues before mostly male audiences just as Janis Joplin would later do in the late '60s. Etta James also knew what Ray Charles knew way back then - that country and the blues are first cousins. "Nashville," she once told an interviewer, "is a down-to-earth

In 1953. Jamesetta Hawkins was singing gospel in an L.A. church. The next

year, she rearranged her first name and became a teenage sensation. In 1955, while employed by Johnny Otis, she wrote and recorded "Roll with Me Henry," the first of at least a dozen top ten hits. But in the mid-60s, James was sidelined by heroin, that showstopper of showstoppers, and was forced to survive on sideman's wages until her comeback: Etta James was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1993 and

ETTA JAMES won both a Grammy for Best Jazz Performance and a W.C. Handy for Best Female Vocalist the next year.



Adventure Travel

Did both your waistline and your credit-card debt swell alarmingly over the holidays? Perhaps you're ready for something lighter in both areas: an exotic, savory vegetarian dinner for a very low price. That's exactly what I set my sights on when we headed north to "Little India" in Mira Mesa.

The problem with most Indian restaurants in the U.S. is, no matter how wonderful (or awful) their quality, their menus are nearly interchangeable. Evidently modeled after the successful Gaylord's chain, most of them offer a limited repertory of North Indian/Moghlai "pick hits" from the Rajah's palace (tandoori, naan, pakoras, et cetera) with just one famously fiery southern dish — the inevitable vindaloo — tossed in for spice.

I was looking for more authentic, regional folk cuisine. And the Madras Café, specializing in the artful vegetarian cooking of Southern India, offers exactly that. In the region where the Hindu prescription of vegetarianism is taken most seriously, a meatless cuisine has evolved so rich and varied that you scarcely notice the missing flesh. The emphasis is on an inventive use of grains to fill the belly, and zesty, complex seasonings to satisfy the taste-buds.

The Madras Café is in a mini-mall that includes three Indian groceries. (The rest of the neighborhood is devoted to the automobile, whole or by the part.) The restaurant occupies part of a converted warehouse that's subdivided into numerous shops. It's plain but attractive, with light yellow walls and an open-beam sea-blue ceiling with a scalloped molding. A partition separates the entry foyer from the dining room, lending eaters some sense of privacy. The tablecloths are of lace-patterned plastic, the napkins are paper. Although most people in India eat with their hands, here you get forks and spoons (no knife), and the patrons use them. Some dishes are served on ceramic or plastic platters, others on traditional thali plates, large divided steel trays reminiscent of those beneath Hungry Man TV dinners.

We chose an earlyish hour on a weeknight, a time when supposedly "nobody" eats out. But within a few minutes of our arrival, the restaurant was more than half full. At a large table nearest us, a vibrant, long-haired woman in red, with a flawless Dravidian complexion the color of walnut, seemed to be hosting a group of friends - perhaps from Northern India, as accented English was

of all of South India.

I'll try mentioning bread first and ordering rice just before naming our entrées.)

The central dishes of Madras — both the region and this restaurant — are dosai and uttapam (more commonly spelled dosa and utthapam). A dosai is a thin, crêpelike pancake made of rice and split lentils; the batter is fermented overnight (like Ethiopian injera) until its texture turns airy — griddling up crisp outside and spongy inside. It can be

used plain as an eating utensil, but more often it's rolled around a stuffing. Probably the most popular and typical Madrasi dish of all is Masala Dosai, a huge crêpe wrapped around

a filling of vegetable curry. "Masala" means "mixture," and there are more masalas than there are cooks in India. Here, the sparse portion of filling was a light, tasty potato-and-green pea mixture with mild green chiles, richly seasoned and slightly sweetened with, I'd guess, palm sugar.

Like nearly all dishes here, dosais come with two sauces on the side — a mildly spicy cilantroyogurt chutney and a *sambar*, a flavorful lentil-based light gravy or soupy stew, with a whole, small semi-

hot chile afloat in the ramekin. There are three much hotter sauces on the table - an incendiary red chili sauce, a red chili and yogurt sauce, and a thicker, spicier cilantro chutney. Although South Indian food has a blazing reputation, in familyfriendly venues like this one, the serious hot stuff is likely to be offered separately, rather than cooked into the food where it might ravage some toddler's tender palate.

A special, smaller version of dosai is called aapam, a crisp-edged lacy rice crêpe made with coconut milk, served with more thick, sweet coconut cream on the side. We loved it. We also relished the uttapam, done here in the style of Bangalore, as a thicker pancake with a cooked-in filling, resembling a frittata. We ventured on a stuffing of onions and chilis. Both the pancake and its flavoring proved deeply satisfying, lively but far from incendiary.

The dish that showed up at every table in the restaurant, including ours, came from the "breads" section of the menu—and little wonder that every-

guages are spoken in India; English is the "lingua franca" among the educated.) Another nearby table held a quartet of jocular young men. We were the only Anglos. Obviously, Madras aces the "downhome-cooking" test among those best fit to judge.

It's truly a regional restaurant: On specific nights, you can opt for a prix-fixe dinner (they're listed on the back of the menu) devoted exclusively

to the specialties of one of the southern states (Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, Andra Pradesh). That evening, my friends and I were more inclined to to take an eating tour

The regular menu is divided into appetizers, dosais (thin pancakes), uttapams (thick pancakes), breads, rice, curries, and desserts. There is not, as it turns out, a really stringent division between categories (aside from dessert). Everything is served whenever the kitchen finishes cooking it; our bread and rice came last, when our meal was almost done. (Coincidentally or not, our dishes arrived in the precise order that we'd ordered them - so next time





body ordered it. Poori, made from ultrafine whole wheat flour, is an airy, delectable fried bread that puffs up into a balloon-size sphere when it hits the hot oil. And like a balloon, it's hollow and deflates - not with a bang but a whisper — when punctured. The *poori* (two per order) came with a little side dish of the same tasty potato curry that we'd enjoyed in the Masala Dosai.

From the "rice" category, we chose tamarind rice, imbued with an addictive sweet-sour flavor. I've never eaten it before and would order it again in a New Delhi minute. "What are those nuts in it?" one of my friends asked. "Boiled peanuts," I said. "That

proves it's real Southern cooking." For a curry dish, we chose aviyal, from the lush, tropical state of Kerala. The dish that I'd enjoyed in Cochin was a slightly sweet, emphatically spicy stew of vegetables in coconut gravy. Madras's rendition was its flavor opposite, with a very sour sauce and no discernible coconut aroma. (This sour aviyal, typically made with buttermilk, is a legitimate variation — I just prefer the sweet.) To add sour to sour, its garnish was a ramekin of plain yogurt.

Any dish that doesn't fit into the other categories seems to end up in the appetizer list. These actually did hit our table first, a minute or two before the flocks of pancakes landed. But when the first appetizer arrived on a square metal serving tray, we all sat staring at it in silence. Just like the nearby group hosted by the Tamil glamour gal, our quartet

meant to share our dishes family-style. The waiter came, the waiter went. "May we have some plates?" one of us finally asked him. He returned to plop down three (not four) metal dishes resembling six-inch round cake pans. (We finally scrounged a fourth by reassigning an emptied serving dish.) I wish I could say that if you have questions about the menu, the staff will gladly explain. Maybe so, maybe not - depends on which waiter, his mood, how busy he is. Don't look for anything at Madras like the hovering, formal "Raj"-style service of the Gaylord's clones or in similar middle-class restaurants in the city for which it's named. (As I learned in my travels, it's just not the Tamil way.)

Potato-filled samosas proved a hearty peasant interpretation of the familiar stuffed pastries, full of life and savor with bits of

semi-hot green pepper in the mixture; they came with a beguiling, sweet-sour tamarind chutney. Rasa vada are lentil-flour "donuts," strongly seasoned with cumin and green chiles - engaging when hot, but leaden once cooled. Idli are sourdough "fritters" made of various fermented grains or pulses. Alas, the menu doesn't offer tiddli idli (ves, that's an actual dish) so we settled for "Kachipuram Idli," based on three types of lentils, with seasonings too complex to enumerate. A very different style of idli was "Idli with Kosthu" — bland white disks of a batter made from cream of wheat cereal, served with a ramekin of light, delicious eggplant curry. (The eggplant's also available solo from the "curries" portion of the menu.)

Indian desserts are notoriously a matter of taste, given their intense sweetness. At Madras,

they're evidently something of an afterthought, too. Our favorite was badaam halwa, an almondmush pudding served warm with a little sweetened-condensed milk. But the gulab jamun (fried dough balls in syrup) were dry at the center and tasted like they were made from a packaged mix (readily available at the Indian groceries on the block). The kulfi (Indian ice milk, typically flavored with rosewater, cardamom, and/or pistachio) was definitely store bought; the youngest waiter strenuously excavated it from a half-gallon cardboard carton. Its texture was shardy with ice crystals and its flavor chillingly sweet. with no hint of the usual exotica. And a carrot halwa was the color and consistency of mashed yams, tasting simply carroty; this was the plainest possible version of the dish, with no festive additions of raisins or nuts to add contrast.

With dessert we had a round of "Indian coffee," very pale and sweet. I got used to the stuff in South Asia and eventually learned to love it, but nobody else at my table could stand it. But we all enjoyed the thick, tart-sweet mango lassi (yogurt drink) with our entrées.

When you travel in South India, you end up meeting most of the few other low-budget roaming gringos currently in your area, chatting all morning as you wait in line at the airline office or the train station to plead for your next ticket. You concur that, even with its decent cheap hotel rooms, reliable electricity, and riveting beauty, Southern India is still "adventure travel." And you all agree on one other point: The very best food in India is in the south. That's why Madras Café, offering "adventure travel" for the mouth, is worth a visit. ■



Fresh, Dude

This burrito's like the Energizer Bunny. It goes on...

kay. This is where it begins. The search for the best burrito in San Diego. And, boy, this hole in the wall on Tenth Street in Coronado seems promising. If you believe my surfing buddy, Joe.

"I tell you, man," he said on the phone this morning, "they have the biggest, the cowabunganest carne asada burritos you'll ever eat! Meet me there. Around one."

So one o'clock, I'm snooping around Coronado, dodging Lexuses and woodies, looking for

this no-name burreatery. Takes a bit of finding, but 20 yards down Tenth, behind Clayton's corner coffee shop, I notice a maroon canopy. Under it, "MEXICAN" and "FOOD" are daubed in blue on either side of a white metal door.

That's it. I clang through. The floor is concrete slabs exactly like the sidewalk outside. The little room is painted white with mauve highlights. A little red tile "roof" overhangs the order counter. A fan and two Spanish-style lamps — yellow glass, black wrought iron — hang from the ceiling.

Please, No Eating on Premises, says a sign. Below it, a handwritten board. "Special: tostada supreme, with beef, beans, lettuce, tomato, guacamole, sour cream... \$3.50."

Hmm. Deal.

"Yes?" says the lady from behind a hole in the back wall.

"Uh, not sure yet. Waiting for my friend," I say. "Take a look," she says, pointing at a big wall

menu. Prices, especially for way-wealthy Coronado, look fabulous. Three rolled tacos are \$1.90. Carne asada tacos cost \$2.00. Chicken tostadas, \$2.55. Two cheese enchiladas go for \$3.15. A combination plate, "two shredded beef tacos with rice

and beans," \$4.75. But the thing I've got to find is that carne asada burrito. Ah. There it is, \$3.45.

"Ready now?" says Maria. Heck, why not? I know Joe has to pick up his kid, Jack, from school. Could be hours. "Carne asada burrito, I guess. Is that your most popular item?"

Maria looks at the cook. Manuel. "For sure," she says. "'Specially when Manuel's on. He's real generous. We had a lady come in from Ohio last week visiting her Navy son. He told her she had to come here first when she visited, because this place had the biggest burritos he'd ever eaten."

Manuel tosses a pile of beef chunks onto the hot plate, adds a large flour tortilla, mixes in a whole lot of stuff — I can see him slopping in guacamole — and in a jiffy he's rolled it up, wrapped it in paper, and bagged it. I order a small Coke too (\$1.15). Lunch for \$4.96 (with tax)!

"You'll want one of these," says the customer behind me, Beatrice. She hands me a little pot of salsa. "They make it here, from *chile de arbol*. It's very good. I'm from Mexico City. This place is the nearest to homecooking. Everything fresh."

Mexico City praising El Norte? Must be good. So I pour the salsa in and munch. Oh, God. Beat-

rice is right. Garlicky beef, loads of guacamole, onions. I taste the cilantro. I chew more. I mean, this burrito's like the Energizer Bunny. It goes on... I balance it in my hand. I swear. Must weigh a pound.

"Only difference between this burrito and one down in Mexico," says Manuel, "is here the meat comes prepackaged. There it's fresh. And here, the tomatoes come in cans. That wouldn't happen down there. But the tortillas are much bigger here."

"And in Mexico City," says Beatrice, "you would only have corn tortillas. Not flour."

"Hey, dude! Eating without us?!"

It's Joe, with Little Jack.

"You're late, dude," I say. "And who could put it off, with these smells?"

"Did you get the extra orders of guac and the sour cream?"

"Didn't know I needed it, dude." Warming up the surf talk here.

"Dude! Get it. You gotta have the real thing. I'm coming in here 22 years, man. I know."

So, what the heck. I go up and Manuel adds great swaths of guac and sour cream. Not too happy, mind you. "These should go in the middle right when everything else is hot and fresh," he says. He won't let me pay the 60 cents extra

that each usually costs. I toss some coins in the tip jar to ease my conscience.

Joe gets three rolled tacos with guac and two 7UPs. "Okay, dude. Up. Let's observe Coronado tradition here."

Turns out "tradition" is taking our food onto the green median in the middle of Orange Avenue and picnicking there, in the shade of a fir tree.

Actually, it's kind of idyllic. It is amazing that you can be in green nature right here and hardly notice the swirls of traffic.

We talk a little surf, help Little Jack with his homework — "Dad, what's nine times four?" "Ask Ed, Jack. He's good at numbers." Ha! But mostly, Joe spends his time waving at cars that beep at him. I swear. The guy knows *every*body in this town.

That's okay. I'm still full-time munching into this incredible burrito. Joe was right about the extras. They give the whole thing a creamy richness that lasts the distance. For sure, this is the burreatery to beat.

"So," says Joe. "You ready for another of Big Daddy's surfing lessons?"

Did I mention? I haven't actually made it to vertical on a surfboard yet.

"Later, Dad," I say. "With this in me, I'd sink like a rock." ■

Cellar Madness

"My wife is really the best guide I have because she pays no attention to the label."

ine has always been bound up with time — each year, after all, produces a new vintage, one that may differ sharply from the previous year's effort. A wine that tastes one way a year after bottling may be

all but unrecognizable after ten, a new (old) thing altogether. In the past three decades, the changes brought by time have become even more significant — each year brings new techniques and advancements, each decade carries new regions to the fore. A book written 20 years ago on Cal-

ifornia wine will prove hopelessly dated, offering little but historical interest.

I am forever finding such books in the Wine and Food sections of used bookstores, but every now and then I stumble upon something that has retained some measure of value despite the passing years. Sometimes it is because the information offered is timeless: the fourth edition of Hugh Johnson's World Atlas of Wine, while not absolutely up to date, still gives a pretty good picture of the world's vineyards.

Even in California the wineries may multiply, but the geography of a place like Sonoma remains largely the same. And sometimes the personal quality of the work transcends simple timeliness: Kermit Lynch's Adventures on the Wine Route is simply good wine writing, and will be even if the debate over wine filtration is eventually resolved. Harry Waugh's Wine Diary is another of these; though the wines he discusses have mostly passed into memory, there is an enduring pleasure in his accounts of their consumption.

This literary sharing in the delights of the vine

did not satisfy local wine lover Tawfiq Khoury, however. He says he would read Waugh's accounts of enjoying a certain wine with a certain dish and, his palate aroused, he would "run down to the local wine shop and say, 'I want this wine.'

Unfortunately, this was in 1973, and the wines that Waugh would be writing about were made in 1945 or 1954. The shopkeepers, whose stock might have gone back to 1970 at best, sent him to auction houses. There Khoury began finding Waugh's wines, and his collection was underway.

Khoury's cellar eventually swelled to around 65,000 bottles, possibly the largest private collection in the world. He never had a specific goal for size in mind, and when he built his first cellar he never thought he would fill it to its 40,000-bottle capacity. But he came under the spell of wine and its almost limitless variability — of place, of age, of vintage, of producer, of varietal. "Collecting is really a disease, in a way," he says, "a just-got-tohave-it kind of a thing. You see something and you say, 'Gee, I don't have it'; you want to have it; you say, 'How do I get it?' " It was not a matter of calculating how many bottles of wine a man and his family could reasonably expect to drink in one lifetime, nor was it a matter of preparing a legacy for future generations. Reason had settled comfortably in the cellar, glass in hand, and left passion to handle the acquisitions.

Though the end result was magnificent, there were no carefully considered guiding principles beyond his own preferences and the opinions of those he trusted. Occasionally he would bid on a wine of great repute, but mostly, he says, "I relied on myself. My wife is really the best guide I have because she pays no attention to the label." As for quantity, "I think deciding how much to get is part of the disease. Sometimes you become so engrossed that you say, 'I want all I can get.' Sometimes that's a mistake, because not all wine lasts forever and you're not going to drink the same wine 30 nights in a row. Sometimes it's silly to buy cases of something. Ten times a – maybe more — I went to excess and bought more than I should have. [When that happened,] I said, 'What am I doing to myself? This is stupid!' But you get over it."

He began in France — the uncontested master of the wine world at the time — and began buying from each region as it ascended. Now, the majority of what he drinks hails from Italy — he finds the wines pair well with the simpler dishes he currently favors. Along the way he became something of a celebrity, in part because of the company he kept. Through the auctions, I met other collectors. We started getting together to do tastings" — say, of the legendary 1945 or '59 classified Bordeaux that Waugh

had eulogized in his diary. "We would invite one or more of the famous wine writers, whether it was Michael Broadbent or Hugh Johnson. The writer would come and write up the notes on the tasting." Khoury's name went into the story, and eventually, a diagram of his cellar appeared in Johnson's Modern Encyclopedia of Wine.

Khoury is older now; at 73, the fires have cooled somewhat. He says he no longer has the compulsion to acquire anything, though he admits that he tries not to look at catalogs from auction houses anymore "so as not to become tempted." In 1997 he sold the lion's share of his cellar at auction. His only plan for what remains of his collection is to "live long enough to drink it."

By his own admission, Khoury belongs to an-





Diagram of Tawfiq Khoury's cellar

other era, and it is hard to imagine an heir to his throne, despite the ever-expanding range of wines from which to choose. For one thing, wines are built to be drinkable younger; for another, they have suffered an astonishing increase in price over the past few decades. "Frankly, the prices have gotten ridiculous in my opinion." He mentions the Sassacaia he bought for \$25 in the mid-'80s; now it sells for at least ten times that amount. The upward spiral reaches even into bargain territory. "One of the wines I truly like is Caliterra from Chile. That used to be \$7 or \$8 at Vons. Now it's around \$15, which is still decent" but double what it was a few years ago. In Khoury's day collecting on a grand scale may have been a kind of disease; today it would be closer to outright madness.

THE ARMENIAN CAFE 3126 Carlsbad Boulevard, Carlsbad, 760-720-2233. Long ago, Turkish conquerors brought Armenian food to Greece. At this large cottage with a sundeck overlooking Highway 101, some dishes (e.g., gyros) have traveled in the opposite direction, and the menu also translates the Armenian specialties to the more familiar Greek food vocabulary. The gyro meat mixture is made on the premises; other good choices are Armenian marinated rack of lamb and shish kebab, including kebab-filled breakfast omelets. Music and belly dancing Friday and Saturday evenings. Three meals, Tuesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

BIRD HOUSE GRILL 250 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-2882. Turkish food is the order of the day at this cute, small café decorated with birdcages, birdhouses, and birds' nests all over. The most popular order is the "Super Combo Plate" of charbroiled gyro meat, *kofte* (ground meat kebabs), and moist chicken kebabs, plus fragrant rice pilaf, Turkish salad, pita, and tzatziki, the traditional yogurt-cucum ber sauce, made here with plenty of dill and a thick, luxury-grade yogurt. Other appealing choices are the vegetable ke-bab or the house special *Iskender* ke-bab, a pile of very fine-grained halved sausages (resembling soft-skinned hot dogs with Middle Eastern seasonings) dressed with tomato sauce and billows of the terrific yogurt. What the Chef Eats

POTATO GNOCCHI

Some of my fondest memories of growing up in Italy are of cooking with my grandmother, "Nonna." From the time I was five, we would cook traditional Italian dishes together. One of our favorite things to make together was gnocchi. I was in charge of rolling the gnocchi in the traditional method, using a special gnocchi board.

Today, gnocchi is still one of my favorite things to make at home and in the restaurant at Vivace. One of the best things about this dish is that it can be made using so many different ingredients, such as potatoes or ricotta cheese. It also can be served in

many different styles one of my favorites is with a bit of caviar.

Potato gnocchi is probably the most traditional. This recipe makes for a simple but flavorful dish. The pinch of nutmeg gives it a flavor like you would experience in Italy. Serve potato gnocchi with a green salad and Montalcino Chianti. This recipe serves four.

HOW TO DO IT Bake potatoes in a bed of salt and whole fresh herbs at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes or until done. Remove from oven and let cool slightly. While still warm, remove skins and

mash together in a mixing

bowl. Add the egg yolks, flour, Parmesan cheese, nutmeg, salt, and pepper. Blend thoroughly.

Take a handful of the mixture and roll into a log shape. Slice into one-inch pieces. Using a gnocchi board, roll the pieces over the board with your thumb so that a crescent shape is formed. (If you don't have a gnocchi board, use a fork to make the crescent shape.) Drop gnocchi in a large pot of boiling water. Gnocchi is done when it rises to the surface and the water begins to boil again.

In a skillet, sauté garlic cloves, oil olive, and Parmesan cheese. Add fresh herbs and gnocchi and



cook until hot. Salt and pepper to taste and serve.

The cuisine is California-French, menus change seasonally. Best bets are rack of lamb, filet mignon, daily fresh fish, and crème brûlée. You'll have a good expe rience here. Lunch weeknights, dinner nightly. Moderate to expensive. -

EL BIZCOCHO Rancho Bernardo Inn, 17550 Bernardo Oaks Drive, Rancho Bernardo, 858-675-8550. You get what you pay for at one of San Diego County's premiere dining destinations - stunning new French cuisine in a lovely, civilized room. The left side of the menu lists traditional golf-andtennis-folk favorites (lobster bisque, filet mignon), but the right side is a daily-changing array of creative dishes by chef Patrick Ponsaty, including a five-course tasting menu. These dishes are not merely luxurious, they're the food of thrills and revelations, with flavor combinations that are intense and

daily lunch and dinner. Inexpensive.

LA ESPECIAL NORTE 604 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-942-1040. This big, brightly lit roadhouse sports highly whimsical decor (take a look at the blue ceramic "pond" in the dining room, complete with cayman) and boasts a five-page menu, including a page of a dozen regional soups and another full page for seafood. The soups are superb instance, the authentic Mexico Citystyle chicken soup is laden with avocados, chicken shreds, cilantro, and rice, and the savory eggplant soup includes airy little "croutons" of puffed *relleno* batter. The fresh, interesting seafood entrées outshine the relatively ordinary renditions of the standard stuffed-tortilla variations. No wheelchair access to rest rooms. Open daily, breakfast

through dinner. Inexpensive. -N.W. (5/02)

PAPA GUS 698 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-944-9168. Healthful Cuban food is the specialty at this tiny, hard-to-find café with a pleasant sheltered patio. (It's just north of La Especial Norte, but the doorway may be half-hidden by hanging T-shirts from the shop next door.) The lively dishes are full o' beans — savory black beans, Cuba's staple dish, cooked with no animal products. There's no red meat on the menu; tuna and turkey are the furthest Papa goes with critters. The "Cuban Black Bean Soup Deluxe," rightly subtitled "a meal in itself," is a cauldron of thick beans (more stew than soup) with melted cheese, onions, avocado, a dash of sour cream and a daub of sprightly fresh salsita. Don't miss the cooked plantains, fully ripe

and as sweet as candied bananas. The menu also offers some Mexican dishes styled with a Cuban accent, an odd-tasting ground-turkey *picadillo* (Cuban hash), plus salads, sandwiches, and smoothies made to order with whole fresh fruit. Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. *N.W.* (10/01)

POTATO SHACK CAFE 120 West I Street (off South Coast Highway 101), Encinitas, 760-436-1282. Check out the cute potato-toon mural on the side of the building — a sign for spud-lovers to load up on portions sized for lumberjacks from The Lumberyard across the street. American fries (served "All you can eat!"), French fries, potato patties, and baked potatoes with various toppings are the heart of the menu, along with eggs, omelets, biscuits with sausage gravy, and beer-battered onion

rings made from sweet reds. If size counts, consider the daunting inch-thick "manhole" pancake that's bigger than the plate. Lunch runs to "deli" sandwiches (with potatoes), or a hearty bowl of chili con carne. Arrive early weekends. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (10/01)

RUBY'S DINER 1 Pierview Way, Oceanside, 760-433-RUBY (7829) One thing about Ruby's: You can build an appetite just getting there. It's at the end of the 1/3 mile-long Oceanside pier. (There's a 50-cent electric wagon, too.) Ruby's is part of a themed "for ties diner" chain stretching from LAX to Scottsdale, Arizona. But it's still fun. Shiny Chevy Corvette-style red leatherette and chrome booths, white walls, portholes, old Coca-Cola signs, "Dewey-Warren" presidential buttons, and that view to Hawaii. And pretty

balanced, audacious and refined. The wine list is awesome and pricey, with numerous half-bottles and some nearbargains in the higher realms (the legendary Chateau Grillet Condrieu at \$126). Dress rules aside, the atmos phere is anything but stuffy: A charming room captain puts you at ease and servers are pleasantly attentive. It's an ideal restaurant for a special night out — and the Sunday brunches are lavish, too. Jacket required, ties usual, women's attire chic or prosperously dowdy, reservations essential. Very expensive. — N.W. (2/01)

ISLAND BOY GRILLE 10066 Pacific Heights Boulevard (south of Mira Mesa Boulevard, at Carroll Canyon Road), Sorrento Mesa, 858-452-7708. It's the last thing you'd expect up here in Corporate Lunchland, but Pua Macario's Hawaiian food sanctuary is the real thing. Pua ("Flower") serves genuine items like purple *taro poi*, seven-hour cooked *lau-lau* (beef, pork, and fish slow-steamed in taro and banana leaves), rice delivered by the ice-cream scoop, potato salad delivered hot with shrimp and crab in it, and mahi mahi, lots of lovely flame-seared mahi mahi. Delivered in a standard polystyrene box, eat in or out. And heavy! The Wasa Plate will include, say, two big pieces of mahi mahi, a pile of shredded kalua pig and cabbage, or kahuna shrimp, or teriyaki chicken, plus two scoops of rice, salad and any side dish. If you're a really big kahuna, the Kanaka Plate will deliver three main entrées and three scoops of rice. Sparse decoration: eggshell blue walls with photos of real hula-dancing, and a longboard by Hawaiian Julian Cruz (it's yours for \$450). Warning: only open 11 a.m. to around 2:30 p.m. Always crowded. Inexpensive. -E.B. (3/02)

LA TAPATIA 340 West Grand Avenue. ido, 760-747-8282. Take a walk on the mild side at this family-owned favorite, in business since the 1930s. You'll find standard Mexican fare in a comfortable dining room or, in good weather, a lovely, arbor-like stonewalled patio. The most celebrated dish is the "cheese crisp," a large tostada covered one-third in ground beef, onethird in beef chunks, and one-third in beans, with cheese, avocado puree, and sour cream over all. Many preparations (grilled seafoods, etc.) are healthy, and veggies taste fresh. Seasonings are rather detuned, but there's a saltshaker and a lively salsa on the table. Moderate. — N.W. (5/01)

SAND CRAB CAFE 222 Micro Place (at Opper, off Barham), Escondido, 760-480-2722. Sandy Crabbe (honest, that's his name) owns this fun, funky dive in the wilds of industrial Escondido near the San Marcos border. A visit offers the primordial, preschool-ish joy of whacking crabs to pieces with mallets and eating them with your hands. (Bibs are optional.) Everybody gets into the party spirit. There's a huge a la carte list of appetizers, soups, snacks, and main courses, often at bargain prices. Entrées include several crab-bucket combos, cooked to a well-seasoned boil with corn, potatoes, and spicy Louisiana sausage. Most of the shellfish were flash-frozen on shipboard, but they're still tasty. The melted non-butter "spread" accompanying them appeals to the area's many healthconscious residents. (Or you can BY-OButter and they'll melt it for you.) Fine tangy housemade key lime pie is a perfect finale. Full bar; not much wine, but good margaritas. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive to moderate. -N.W. (5/01)

TONG SZECHUAN 609 North Broadway #E-F, Albertson's Shopping Center, Escondido, 760-480-9438. The "New Style Favorites" of North County Chinese restaurants feature fresh fruits Tong's has several variants, mainly cornstarch-battered fried proteins in honey-based sweet-and-sour sauce, lightened with loads of seasonal fruit chunks — pineapple, papaya, pear, etc. They're tasty dishes. For the rest, the Szechuan specialties (hot-and-sour soup, kung pao, ma la, etc.) are better

than the old "Chinese-American" standards on the menu. Lunches are big, bargain-priced, and popular. In this quiet, pretty room, you may overhear northern or western Chinese dialects at nearby tables. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Very inexpensive (lunch) to low-moderate. — *N.W.* (5/01)

VINCENT'S SIRINO'S 113 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-745-3835. French-born chef-owner Vincent Grumel serves Gallic classics in an intimate, small-town bistro setting. This is a cuisine of rich dark sauces robing fine ingredients, such as a huge, flavorful veal chop (no factory calf, that). Mushrooms and vegetables (from local farmers or Grumel's own garden) are the season's best and sensitively treated. Desserts are worth every calorie — save room for the spectacular Bavarian. Full bar, fine wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner Tuesday through Saturday. (Closed annually from third week of June to third week of July.) Expensive. — N.W. (6/01)

GOLD COAST

BARONE'S TRATTORIA DEL MARE 2334 Carmel Valley Road, Del Mar, 858-259-9063. Pleasant interior, 27 pastas, low prices, huge portions of tasty food make this a winner for all bargain seekers. On weekends, try the paella, large enough for two. Linguine rustica and chicken Marsala best bets. Lunch, Tuesday through Friday; dinner, Tuesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.W. (1/00)

SAMURAI JAPANESE RESTAU-RANT 979 Lomas Santa Fe Drive, Lomas Santa Fe Plaza, Solana Beach, 858-481-0032. This restaurant boasts "the largest California sushi bar" as well as a menu of over 100 items. The food is artistically prepared and presented, the sushi uniformly fine. You can easily make a meal from the sushi and ap-petizers. Seating is available at the sushi bar or the central dining area, which provides capacious booths. A tatami room (with floor-seating on tatami mats, Japanese style) offers special prix fixe feasts (\$60 per person and up), by

reservation only. Open daily. Moderate to extremely expensive. — E.W.

TRATTORIA POSITANO (CARDIFF-BY-THE-SEA) 2171 San Elijo Avenue, Cardiff-by-the-Sea, 760-632-0111. If you're tired of Italian restaurants, you'll be revitalized by this one. Original recipes, wonderful fresh fish, nightly specials, excellent lamb and pastas. Very warm atmosphere. A treasure. Reservations accepted only for parties of six or more; expect a wait at prime dinner hours, especially on weekends. Lunch and dinner six days, Sundays dinner only. Upper moderate.

910 RESTAURANT Grande Colonial Hotel, 910 Prospect Avenue, La Jolla, 858-964-5400. In this lively, casual-chic dining room, Chef Michael Stebner shapes a constantly changing, luxuri-ous menu based little on "luxury foods" and much more on inspired combinations of luxuriously perfect local, seasonal foodstuffs - clean, fine flavors that taste like themselves. Most items are available as either "small" or "large" plates, so it's easy to create your own tasting menu without breaking the bank. Pastry chef Jack Fisher creates the avant-garde desserts. Open daily, three meals; Monday (typically chef's night off) is a best bet, with Stebner usually on hand to cook for his peers. Upper moderate to expensive. — N.W. (11/01)

LA TAVERNA 927 Silverado Street (at Girard Avenue), La Jolla, 858-454-0100. Reservations are a necessity at this tiny trattoria, especially if you'd prefer the relative quiet of the roofed sidewalk patio to the din of the cute but cramped dining room. Don't look for meatballs and red sauce except at lunch because dinner is Tuscan-style showcasing pastas with simple, fresh sauces. Highlights include chef-owner Mary Ann Vitale's house-made Sicilian-style fennel sausage, and if the feather-light potato gnocchi are a spe-cial, just say yes. Save room for a slice of house-made layer cake. Service is downright endearing on weekends, when Jimmy Vitale (the owner's husband) charmingly plays maitre d'. Moderate. — *N.W.* (11/00)

MANHATTAN OF LA JOLLA Empress Hotel, 7766 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-459-0700. If you're searching for a restaurant that provides a sense of gaiety as well as good New York-style Italian food, then try Manhattan of La Iolla. Of the many tantalizing à la carte dishes, some of the best are rack of lamb, superb steaks, and "Seafood Mediterranean." Cannelloni is the best in San Diego. Very New York atmosphere, Lunch and dinner daily, Reserve for weekend dinners. Expensive. -

ON TAP: BISTRO AND BREWERT 4353 La Jolla Village Drive (next to Macy's), University Towne Centre, La Jolla, 858-587-6677. On Tap! serves the best food of any brewery in San Diego. The same menu is served continuously from lunch to closing. Best dishes are spit-roasted chicken and penne with salmon and shrimp. All beers are brewed on the premises. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *E.W.*

PANDA COUNTRY 4150 Regents Park Row #190, University Towne Centre, La Jolla, 858-552-1345. Gorgeous surroundings and stunning pre-sentations carry the day here. The exwith its 11 appetizers and 30 seafood and fish dishes prepared Mandarin or Szechuan style. Scallops and shrimp re-ceive special treatment. Open daily. Inexpensive to expensive. — E.W.

TAPENADE 7612 Fav Avenue, La Iolla 858-551-7500. Surely one of the best restaurants in the county, you'll find superb, utterly assured French cooking by famed chef-owner Jean-Michel Diot. This is the modern style of French cuisine, light and clean to let every ingredient shine, unmasked by heavy sauces. Each dish is perfect. Pork ten-derloin, Muscovy duck, foie gras, and the fresh fish are small triumphs. Worth every penny. Expensive to very expensive. — *E.W.* (7/98)

TORREYANA GRILL Hilton La Iolla Torrey Pines, 10950 Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-450-4571. Best seafood buffet in city, served Friday nights, 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. At least 21 items, most of them fresh seafood and fish plus New York-cut beef and chicken. Price is \$28.95, \$10.95 for children. Add \$10 for 1-1/4 pound fresh Maine lobster steamed to order. Excellent value for the money. Friday night only. Expensive. — *E.W.* (6/99)

TRATTORIA ACQUA 1298 Prospec Street, La Jolla, 858-454-0709. You'll do fine if you stay with the simplest dishes: marinated grilled chicken breast on pizza dough, grilled portobello mushrooms, or pasta dishes. Entrées from shores other than Italian don't fare as well. The restaurant is located two flights down and offers an ocean view and patio as well as indoor dining. Elevator located at garage below on Coast Boulevard. Open daily. Moderate (some pastas) to very expensive. -

TUTTO MARE 4365 Executive Drive (at Executive Way), Golden Triangle, 858-597-1188. The modern Italian cuisine here emphasizes pasta and fresh seafood from the mesquite grill or oak-fired oven. Lunch hours roar with chic

crowds from the surrounding office buildings, but the kitchen is most on its toes then, too. Pastas are mainly housemade, with fresh-tasting sauces, and substantial seafood salads are available. Entrées (whether seafood or meat) may be overcooked by the fierce wood fires, and most come with minor variations of the same lemon-butter sauce and a one-size-fits-all veggie medley. Full bar, interesting wine list, good Happy Hour nibbles. Complimentary valet parking. Call for careful directions (very hard to find). Extremely noisy. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner weekends. Pastas and salads moderate, entrées expensive. — N.W. (10/02)

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

94TH AERO SQUADRON 8885 Balboa Avenue, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-6771. One of San Diego's hidden jewels: there's classic American fare (honey-glazed pork tenderloin, farmhouse chicken) in the "Officers' mess," but better yet is the free buffet Happy Hour — pig heaven weekdays from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Selections might include a "stroganoff" of Polish sausage, veggies, cheese potatoes, nachos, etc. (Of course, you have to buy something — say, a pitcher of Bud for two.) Thursdays and Fridays, the outside "Runway" grill features kebabs. The biggest attraction is the place itself. Built to mimic a WWI French farmhouse taken over by a bunch of Yankee flying aces, it has a garden full of antique planes and live ducks — and right outside, the real Montgomery airfield. In-expensive to moderate. — E.B. (11/00)

ANDRES' PATIO RESTAURANT 1235 Morena Boulevard, Bay Park, 619-275-4114. This is a cozy cultural surprise on hard-to-define Morena Boulevard. The food is flavorful (and not spicy-hot like Mexican and South American dishes). A good introduction to it is *ropa vieja* ("old clothes"): shredded beef sautéed with mushrooms, green pepper, and tomatoes with ever-present rice and black beans. And the Cuban sandwich (roast pork, baked ham, and cheese) shows off the Cuban handling of pork. Other interesting dishes include *alcapuria* (pork and green plantain) and luscious, messy yuca con mojo (yuca root with garlic oil). Open for lunch Monday to Thursday, lunch and dinner Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. -E.B. (8/01)

BALE FRENCH SANDWICH SHOP 6937 Linda Vista Road (at Ulric Street), Linda Vista, 858-565-8057. Also, 4879 University Avenue (at 49th Street), City Heights, 619-283-4352. Ann Nguyen started this back in 1980, and her prices haven't changed - they're incredibly low. But the taste of her sandwiches is up there in French-Vietnamese heaven. The Vietnamese are special at this: they



do French better than the French — with some spicy Asian touches. The BBQ Pork French sandwich delivers the immediate taste of cilantro, garlicky mayonnaise, sweet barbecue sauce, carrots, onions, cucumber, and lashings of sliced pork, with the occasional heat of a green jalapeño. EMERALD CHINESE SEAFOOD RESTAURANT Pacific Gateway Plaza, 3709 Convoy Street (at Aero Drive), 1st floor, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888. Arguably the best Chinese restaurant in the county, here's where local Asians (of all nations) go for both casual family dinners and special feasts of Hong Kong specialties. When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Vietnamese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gourmet delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations accepted for all meals, including weeken dim sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in made-to-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate, with moderate splurges like live fish at Aeking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). Open daily from lunch until midnight or later.

HUNGRY STICK 4664 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 619-272-1412. "Life's too short to drink cheap beer," says the sign. They must mean it. At Happy Hour (weekdays 4 p.m. to 7 p.m.), a 24-ounce glass of Guinness is as cheap as a Bud. Which is nice because it goes great with this pool bar's greatest hit: "San Diego's Famous 1/2-lb. Steerburger." The burger bun is crisp, the big slab of meat's crunchy-grilled, and the tomato, lettuce and raw onion are fresh. The small menu also includes chicken breast on a bun, patty melt, and hot wings. They boast 24 beers on tap, and, of course, dozens of giant-screen sports TVs. Open seven days, until late. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

PHUONG TRANG 4170 Convoy Street (at Balboa Avenue), Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6750. Named after the Vietnamese owner's daughter, this is a big, neon-bright eating hall with off-white walls, black-and-red chairs, green plastic coconut trees, and ads for "Michelob Bia." It buzzes with a warm and humming atmosphere. Standard fare like pho (rice noodle beef soup), mi (egg noodle soup combinations), and chao (porridge) are all here. The chao long (pork stomach porridge) is nutritious. But come for celebrations too. Order ahead for grilled whole catfish, usually a huge shared plate, or lau (hotpots). The meat and seafood combination lau is great. Less expensive, but also interesting, is the "Phuong Trang Special Broken Rice" piled on with shredded pork, steamed egg, fried tofu, a choice of meats, and a sweet fish sauce. Don't leave without a Vietnamese coffee, which drips into its condensed milk base right at your table. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (1/02)

SEOUL B.B.Q. 4344 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 619-505-0038. This Korean restaurant means sitting before a sizzling cast-iron grill, sipping hot sake, the smell of grilled beef, grilled onions, and fresh garlic in the air. Try the "Korean B.B.Q." marinated short ribs (tong galbi) or thick marbled slices of sirloin (beef gui). You'll enjoy all the accompanying dishes that make the meal, like crunchy seaweed salads, radishes in garlicky tomato sauce, slow-cooked potatoes with soy sauce and jalapeño pepper. Feeling adventurous? Go for the goat meat hot pot or Korean steak tartare (yukhwoe). This is sensual, elemental, hairy-chested food. — M.N. (12/99)

THE BEACHES

CHINA INN 877 Hornblend Street (between Garnet and Grand Avenues), Pacific Beach, 858-483-6680. At least 118 items appear on the menu, which offers Mandarin and Szechuan specialties and includes sweet-and-pungent shrimp, Mandarin pork rib, duck in orange sauce, and shrimp in garlic sauce. Simple setting; outstanding food. The dinner is always preferable when Andy Kam, the chef/owner, is there. Ask his advice about dishes. Open daily, continuous service, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.W.

HARBOR'S EDGE Sheraton Harbor Island Resort, 1380 Harbor Island Drive (across from airport), Harbor Island, 619-291-2900. The restaurant has a stunning bay view and contemporary interior. Good California cuisine includes fish, chicken, pastas. For inexpensive diversion, try the Bakery (adjacent to the dining room) where sandwiches and pastries are served. Open daily, breakfast, lunch, dinner, and Sunday brunch. Moderate to expensive. — E.W.

THE MISSION CAFE AND COFFEE HOUSE 3795 Mission Boulevard (at San Jose Place), Mission Beach, 858-488-9060. Gourmet and Latino breakfasts served in funky surroundings. Outstanding are cinnamon French toast, blackberry-banana pancakes, and roast beef hash with rosemary potatoes and eggs. Chino-Latino lunch items. All dishes plus fabulous bread, scones, muffins, available for take-out. Open daily 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.W.

QWIIGS BAR & GRILL 5083 Santa Monica Avenue, Ocean Beach, 619-222-1101. A splendid ocean view, a good sushi bar, sprightly salads, and fresh fish are the main attractions here. Friendly service. Long flight of stairs to the dining room, with an elevator for wheelchair access. Open daily. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

SAPPORO JAPANESE RESTAU-RANT 5049 Newport Avenue (by the pier), Ocean Beach, 619-222-6686. It's small, but Sapporo has big deals, particularly the lunch specials that usually give you a miso soup, salad, and a combo such as chicken teriyaki and California rolls and white rice — all presented like a piece of performance art. Other specials include *yaki soba* (stir-fried sautéed chicken, vegetables, and noodles) and *Champon* noodle soup (*udon* noodles, scallops, shrimp, vegetables), and the value-packed Chicken Bowl — a big plate of sliced chicken, broccoli, other vegetables, and a swag of rice. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/01)

THE SURFSIDE 4527 Mission Boule vard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-273-2979. In the evenings, it's a "scene" here — for good reason. You'll find fresh sushi, sashimi, and "California coastal cuisine," i.e., fun and flavorful fusion-y tapas, many of them going for half-price during weeknight Happy Hours. You can actually reserve for the sushi bar (it'll put you at the head of the line), where the chefs are unusually friendly. They shine on simple, pure Japanese sushi, although they make the usual "party rolls," too. Most seafood is of fine quality (except the toro, which seems to have problems). For those preferring a tapas-style sit-down meal, there's a breezy, informal dining room with large windows look-ing out on the street, plus a small private dining room for parties. Four Japanese beers, 10 sakes available. Reservations urged for large groups. Parking is tight; just one handicapped slot in front lot. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (10/02)

SUSHI OTA 4529 Mission Bay Drive (at Bunker Hill Street), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5670. What becomes a legend most? At its best, this renowned sushi bar offers fish of exceptional quality, perfect tart-sweet rice, tight wraps, and disciplined creativity. These joys don't come easily. First, find the place: Driving south from Balboa, look left, and ll into the mini-mall with the large 7-11 sign (opposite Rubio's). Sit at the sushi bar to snoop on your neighbors' choices, watching for off-menu extravaganzas, e.g., sea snails cooked over flaming sugar or the irresistible "sushi sundae" (*uni, toro*, mountain potatoes, salmon roe). Don't miss the ama-ebi with crisp shrimp heads atypically flash-baked (not batter-fried). Cooked dishes are dull except for *chawan-mush* (custard broth with gingko nuts). Alas, when Ota-san's away, his elves may play — amateurishly. Best bet: Reserve a bar seat for an early dinner Wednesdays through Saturdays, when the mas-ter is most likely to be present. Disabled

access chancy; long, crowded waits unless you've reserved. Moderate. — *N.W.* (11/00)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

ASIA CAFE 4710 Market Street (at 47th Street), Chollas View, 619-527-1917. May be Asian San Diego's best-kept secret. You have to look behind the smog shop at this all-Laotian shopping center to find it. The

menu's Southeast Asian, but the owner—and most of the conversation around you— is Lao. Lao dishes include the famous Larb-Kai (chicken salad with hot peppers, lemon grass, and sticky rice). Good regional alternatives: Bamee (egg noodle) roasted pork soup, Crying Tiger (ground beef salad with vegetables), Duck Head BBQ, and Lard Nar (seafood, beef, or pork with sloppy wide noodles and vegetables). Closed Tuesdays. Inexpensive.—E.B. (10/01)

HAPPY HOUR SPORTS BAR 2519 Market Street, Sherman Heights. (No phone.) Winner: hardest-to-find eatery in San Diego. You have to walk from 25th and Market till you hear the sound of barking dogs. Next to their dusty yard sits a little building that looks 100 years old and they say used to be a carriage house. It is 10 feet wide at the max, weather-worn chocolate brown, and hidden by a big California pepper tree. No sign except for a notice in the musty window: "Yes, we're OPEN." Reminds you of *Lonesome Dove*. Inside, maybe the friendliest bar since *Cheers*, but a lot smaller, a lot more real. During the week expect only hot dogs, but

weekends, great bargains with downhome dishes like the Pork Chop Plate, Swiss steak with mashed potatoes, gravy and corn, and BBQ spare ribs. Outside BBQ during the football season. Closed Tuesday and Wednesday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

PHOENICIA 3381 Adams Avenue (at 34th Street), Normal Heights, 619-282-4120. To find this tiny restaurant — the longest-running eatery on Adams Avenue — look for a window featuring a cedar tree (the symbol on the Lebanese flag), an American flag, and the word "Phoenicia" written in

Arabic and English. The inside is cramped, but they have sidewalk tables, too. Try their baked eggplant stuffed with lamb, pine nuts, onions, and garlic, or the *kafta* kabob, with ground meat, parsley, onions, and pita bread. The real treat is the *kibbeh neyeh*, raw lamb with cracked wheat, onions, and seasonings, but you'll need to call 24 hours ahead to get it. Homemade rose juice and Lebanese coffees are delicious, too. Breakfast through very early dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

SAIGON 4455 El Cajon Boulevard, City Heights, 619-284-4215 or 619-284-4288. You're in a big glass palace here. It's especially good on Sun-days, when three- or four-generation Vietnamese families gather for lunch. Gaggles of waiters hover a glance away, but take your time. The menu has over 250 items on it. Default choice: *pho*, the famous, filling soup-meal of Vietnam where beef cooks in the soup. Another safe bet is stir-fried crispy or soft egg noodle with seafood and assorted vegetables. "33" Vietnamese beer is on hand to make Saigon lovers sentimental. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

TRIEU CHAU RESTAURANT 4653 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-280-4204. This is as near as you'll

come to eating breakfast in Phnom Penh or lunch in Vientiane, Cambodians come in the morning to talk politics and play Cambodian chess. At lunch, Laotians replace them. Maps of "Kampuchea" decorate the walls, as well as long-distance telephone ads. The menu includes Chinese, Khmer, and Lao dishes. In the morning, ask for "djak kvai coffay dok ko" — fried bread with Cambodian coffee, the standard French-Khmer breakfast. Later in the day, you might try pan-fried noodles with broccoli and beef or shrimp and gravy ("koitiow bahat sai kho"). If in doubt, ask for Kathy, who speaks Chinese, Khmer, Lao — and English. Open daily, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

TURF SUPPER CLUB 1116 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-234-6363. At this cozy saloon (a landmark since 1950, "re-established" in 1998), if your meat's done wrong, it's your own fault. Every night's an indoor cook-out, as patrons huddle by the communal fire-pit tending their steaks (a choice of three ritzy cuts, well-marinated in garlic and olive oil), burgers, chicken breasts, or portobello mushrooms; oth-ers choose the veggie kabobs or teriyaki skewers of beef, chicken, or fish. And that's the menu. The only side dish is a simple salad - not even fries. But the meat's a treat, especially the huge, juicy Delmonico rib eye. If you're an utterly hopeless cook, a staffer will mind your meal for you, but you'd miss half the fun. Full bar, no reservations. Open nightly. Inexpensive to barely moderate. — *N.W.* (4/01)

EAST COUNTY & STATE COLLEGE

EFFIN'S PUB AND GRILL 6164 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-229-9800. Come here after a hard day's hittin' the books at nearby State. It's a brass-on-the-fan-blades, wild west-looking place where things can get west-looking place where things cating year pretty lively. The surprise is they have some pretty good food, especially the pizzas. Check the house specials: Mon-day Madness (an "x-large pizza with domestic draft pitcher"), Taco Tuesday (tacos are bi-ig), and Wing Wednesday (hot & spicy wings go for a song). But, best of all, you can come up to the bar and say "Gimme an Effin beer" and not have to duck. Closed Sundays. Inexpensive to moderate. E.B. (11/01)

LA MESA OCEAN GRILLE AND SEAFOOD MARKET 5465 Lake Murray Boulevard (at Maryland Street), La Mesa, 619-463-1548. This spot speaks seafood in several accents — Italian, Mexican, Cajun, and "Continental." One part of its menu is devoted to basic fare, such as seafood sandwiches, tacos, and various simple fish prepara-tions (fried, blackened, "wraps"). Then

there are the more elaborately saucedand-garnished seafood dinner entrées, most with pasta accompaniment. Fisheschewers will find chicken and veal in classic Italian treatments (scaloppini, piccata, etc.), plus nightly specials Seafood here is very fresh and properly cooked, although there are occasional missteps — too much salt in the black-ening, a hollandaise that tastes of lemony mayo. Salads are fresh but iceberg-standard; hot rolls are delicious sourdough, and the halibut ceviche is a treat — cool, refreshing, and slightly tart. Baked Maryland-style crab cakes in a thick red-pepper sauce are gooeyrich and tasty. The ambience, too, is a mixture of styles — from the encyclopedic fish posters of a basic fish house, to the lace curtains and tablecloths of an old-style seafood restaurant, to the slightly hip modernity of charcoal-gray track-lighting and black-background fish-design upholstery. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — A.M. (5/01)

LUCKY STAR SEAFOOD RESTAU-

RANT 3983 54th Street (at University Avenue, in Kmart Shopping Mall), College Area, 619-229-8228. The Cantonese and Mandarin menu runs to 225 dishes, not to mention the dim sum lunches from roving carts bearing goodies. The huge room is perfect for large parties (call ahead to reserve) or banquets. Not to be missed are lobster dishes, steamed whole fish, Dungeness crab in special sauce, and frog's legs. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to upper moderate. -E.W. (9/99)

SUNNY GARDEN CUISINE OF CHINA 5500 Grossmont Center Drive (next to Target), La Mesa, 619-464-2288. Decent Chinese food, in

East County, in a mall? Yes. Fans of fried goodness will of course swoon over tempura shrimp — panko-crusted, huge and tender — but they might also start with the smoked chicken: smoky meat swaddled in an orangey fried coat, served atop a deeply munchable bed of salty-sour fried mustard greens. The menu is typically broad. Chicken, shrimp, beef and pork are all given the mu-shu treatment mixed with bamboo shoots, bean sprouts, and thin, chewy mushrooms and wrapped tableside (if you like) in papery pancakes. Yu-hsiang (with shrimp, beef, or pork) includes vegetables that are flavorful (not afterthoughts) in a refreshingly nonsweet vinegar sauce. Specialties include Peking duck and fried noodle nests filled with either seafood or beef. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — A.M. (4/02)

VALLEY HOUSE RESTAURANT

10767 Woodside Avenue, Santee, 619-562-7878. This is for Cornbelt folks, plus wannabes who enjoy plainspeaking, plenty-of-it Iowan food. Take the morning special, "Iowa Breakfast": breaded pork tenderloin, two eggs, and hash browns, fries, or grits, plus a choice of biscuits, muffins, or toast it's delicious. Lunch or dinnertime vou can't go wrong ordering the signature "Iowa Porker" hot sandwich (breaded pork tenderloin in a bun with soup, potato salad, or steak fries) or the "Iowa Beefers" (seasoned ground beef simmered in chicken broth, piled into a burger bun). Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

FAR EAST

DULZURA CAFE Highway 94 at Dulzura, 619-468-9591. Think *Grapes of Wrath*, Okies, the 1930s. Dulzura Café is the real thing, serving big, hot meals to weary westerners since 1910. The walls are cluttered with license plates, pots, brass cream-separators, corn-shuckers, horse collars, railroad lanterns, ancient egg-beaters, six-foot snake skins, deer antlers, and a seedy stuffed bobcat head. The food's for filling. Big, juicy hamburgers with lanky home-cut fries, thick slices of meat loaf, or if you arrive early, steak and eggs or a hefty Denver omelet. This is frontier food before slim spelled "success." Breakfast and lunch Monday through Thursday, three meals on weekends. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

POTRERO'S CAFE 25125 Highway 94, Potrero, 619-478-2694. Watch for the three great old Live Oak trees. This café sits under them and looks straight out of a 1930s Western movie. Lot of

good old boys in ten-gallon hats gather here. The menu's non-PC. It features rib-sticking food from biscuits and gravy to a mountain of hot cakes, or the famous mushroom-and-onions hamburger with baked beans. Open for breakfast and lunch; closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

arms around any of them. The dishes are often ambitious; a few soar, but many falter due to flaws in conception, execution, or both. Largely ho-hum wine list needs selections with enough sweetness to stand up to items featur-ing Asian spice — where are the Ries-lings? Still, the place seems full of happiness and friendliness: yellow and orange walls, plenty of smiles amid the bustle. Soups receive lavish attention, and sometimes live up to their billing—the blood orange and roasted butternut squash soup is delicious, dark and complex. The generous, marvelous lavender-infused crème brûlée makes this a dessert destination — pause to sniff a spoonful before slipping it between your lips. Inexpensive to moderate. — *A.M.* (4/01)

BOMBAY EXOTIC CUISINE OF IN-

DIA 3975 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest Cinemas complex, Hillcrest, 619-298-3155. Don't miss the elegant food, the lovely setting, the loving service. Owned by the former proprietors of Monsoon. You will find the food subtle and sophisticated. This Indian restaurant is a olessing to our community. All-youcan-eat buffet lunch \$8.98 daily. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to upper moderate. — E.W.

CABLE CAR CAFE 1945 Adams Ave nue, University Heights, 619-291-8607. A lot of San Diego history is tied to this place. For starters, a real Frisco-style cable car used to terminate near here from downtown. So did later electric trolleys at Trolley Barn Park across the road. Harvey Bentley's ostrich farm was here too — which explains the mural of ostrich characters inside. They say the first Cable Car Café opened on this spot in the 1920s. Today it's a happy lit-tle red-and-white corner joint offering honest American fare. Breakfast includes two eggs any style with potatoes and toast, or "make-your-own" threeegg omelets. Walk by late morning and your nose will lead you in — the own-ers roast their own beef with fresh garlic every day. One great result: the Ca-ble Car cheese steak (sliced beef, grilled onions, and cheese on a hoagie roll) Or try the BBQ pork sandwich (with coleslaw, potato, or pasta salad). Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (6/02)

CAFE ON PARK 3831 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-293-7275. Okay, it's trendy, from the rusty spoonand-fork sign at the door to the PC in dustrial interior (concrete walls, exposed plumbing). But don't expect PC food. The plates are huge and overflowing with fodder. Breakfast scrambles are popular with add-ons such as smoked salmon, artichoke hearts, or brie cheese. Health nuts choose the Park Porridge stuffed with apples, raisins, and honey. But the prize may be the dish that Placerville, California, miners ordered when they came down from the mountains with pockets full of gold: the Hangtown Fry — luscious marinated sautéed ovsters scrambled in eggs. Lunch has deals too: the roasted eggplant is cheap and good. Three meals weekdays, only breakfast and lunch (and a line at the door) on weekends. — E.B. (10/01)

CAFE PACIFICA 2414 San Diego Avenue, Old Town, 619-291-6666. Superior standards always prevail here. The cooking is clean to the palate and bursting with freshness. For appetizers: Dungeness crab cakes or mussels steamed in chardonnay. For entrées, daily fresh fish, lamb chops, pasta. Everything is memorable. Not to be missed. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

CAFE W 3680 Sixth Avenue (south of Pennsylvania Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-291-0200. Chef-owner Chris Walsh combines world-ranging ingredients into eclectic, fusion-y "tapas" to mix, match, and share around the table in a lively, casual ambience. Three plates per person make a reasonably filling meal, particularly if you include some starches (e.g., pizza, polenta). Unfortunately, though, the number of menu choices has grown to a length be-yond what the kitchen can execute with any consistency. Numerous vegetarian choices. Can be very noisy. Dinner Wednesday through Sunday. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (4/02)

HAMBURGER MARY'S 308 Univer sity Avenue (at Third Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-491-0400. All the action is on the patio, under ficus trees, ferns, the palapa bar, and white umbrellas. Bougainvillea bursts out of tables.

Hamburger Mary's mural comes at you in a Stetson, wild red hair, big blue eyes, and a plump butt. Basically it's a gay rendezvous, but everybody's welcome. The burgers are way-big with funky ti-tles like the "I'm Sooo Bleu" burger with bacon and bleu cheese crumbles, or the "Two Tons Of Fun," a six-inchhigh double-burger with mushrooms, bacon, lettuce, cheese, and onions. The kicker is they're all served between wickedly crisp, sweet slabs of golden Hawaiian bread. Open daily until 2 a.m., grill until 11 p.m. Moderate. — *E.B.* (3/01)

JOE'S GRILL 3537 Fifth Avenue (at Brooks, inside Nunu's Cocktail Lounge), uptown, 619-295-2878. Nunu's is a bar with a history. It has always been a tuna fishermen's hangout. You still hear Italian and Portuguese in the mornings. But evenings, the neighborhood shows up, along with chefs and maitre d's from the Gaslamp, and the theater crowd — directors, actors, disciples. Most end up going to the hole in the back where Joe serves up his solid, no-nonsense nosh, from meat loaf to his half-pound mushroom-andbacon cheeseburger to his much-loved pot roast. You won't leave hungry unless you're timid. You have to shout good and loud through that cubbyhole; Joe's got a lot of noise back there. Open until midnight. Inexpensive. E.B. (9/01)

KHYBER PASS 523 University Avenue (at Fifth Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-294-7579. The room's very modern, but Afghan cuisine is full of history, carrying echoes of both Persian and Indian foods, with even a hint of Greek (Alexander the Great conquered the region). Dinners feature kebabs, tandooris, curries, and some unique regional specialties. Flavors are exotic but oddly comfortable to the cosmopolitan palate. Among the don't-miss items are the outstanding aushak (spring onion ravioli) and mantu (ground-meat ravioli) — both with lively yogurt sauces — and zamordd chalow, a spicy lamb-and-spinach stew. Save room for the sexy desserts. Can be noisy inside: small sidewalk patio. Private dining room upstairs bookable for parties. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (9/02)

ONO SUSHI AND PACIFIC SPICE 1236 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-0616. If you are searching for huge portions, fresh tasty food and reasonable prices, don't overlook this col-orful Japanese/Pacific Rim café. Excellent specialty rolls, entrées, appetizers. Very crowded weekends; lively young crowd. Dinners nightly; open for lunch Saturday and Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.* (11/98)

SAFFRON NOODLES AND SATE 3737 India Street, Mission Hills, 619-574-7737. Casual Thai food, noodle dishes, soups, saté (grilled chicken, beef, pork) to eat in or take out. Best bet: chicken noodle soup and curry served Wednesday only. Gorgeous artwork. Open daily, same menu all day. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

TERRA 3900 Vermont Street, Uptown Center, Hillcrest, 619-293-7088. Coowner Jeff Rossman, formerly in charge of the front of the house, has moved into the kitchen to serve as chef at this comfortable neighborhood spot, serving venturesome, if uneven, tropicalinfluenced American cooking. You can settle in a spacious southwest-tinged dining room or people-watch from a sheltered outdoor patio (with smoking permitted). Generously sized tapas can serve as appetizers or as a sustaining bite before venturing into Trader Joe's across the street. The dinner menu changes seasonally, featuring barbecue items during the summer, comforting fare in colder weather, and special dinners on all major holidays. Good wine list with several flights available, full bar with tropical cocktails (Pisco Sours, Caipirinhas, et al.). Reservations advised, especially for weekends, holidays and special events (e.g., Sunday "blues and barbecue" during the summer). Open daily for lunch or brunch, snacks, dinner, Moderate. — N.W. BLUE POINT COASTAL CUISINE 565 Fifth Avenue (at Market Street), Gaslamp, 619-233-6623. Very classy atmosphere and menu — mostly fish and seafood — to match. You can eat

appetizers at the bar, but best bets are nightly fish entrées or steak and crab cakes served with lots of organic vegetables. A welcome addition to downtown. Dinner only, from 5 p.m. Expensive. — E.W.

CABO CAFE & GRILL 808 West Cedar (near Pacific Coast Highway), Little Italy, 619-595-1618. This miracle restaurant is run by homeless kids from the Monarch School Project next door, with a little help (okay, a lot) from Ru-bio's and its founder Ralph. He helped raise a million dollars to get the school and the restaurant running. Think Star-bucks meets Taco Bell (oops, sorry Ralph). The place is like its kid-staff: smart, cheery (they painted all the seals and porpoise murals), with a great fountain-gurgling patio outside. Try the grilled burrito (grilled chicken or steak with guacamole, roasted salsa, sour cream, black beans, Mexican rice, and melted Jack cheese in a warm tortilla) or, as a great filler, the Cabo Maestro Bowl, with marinated grilled chicken or steak in a bowl with black beans, Mexican rice, cheeses, gua-camole, and shredded cabbage. And ves, they do make the Rubio fish taco. Daily specials. Open weekdays, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. E.B. — E.B. (5/02)

CAFE 828 828 Sixth Avenue (at F Street), Gaslamp, 619-231-8282. Jay Greenfield (long-time chef at the celebrated Bernard') in Rancho Bernardo) presides at this "find," a small, civilized bistro serving almost homey Mediterranean dishes with some California touches. Everything's carefully cooked from scratch and presented without pretension. Don't miss the home-style fried calamari or the scallop on lobster risotto. Desserts alone are worth the trip here: the classic warm apple tarte Tatin on a crackly-thin crust ...a pecan "cannoli" filled with a dense, satin-soft white chocolate mousse.... Full bar; below-average corkage for BYO wines. 'Sunset special" three-course dinner is a bargain. Dinner nightly, until 11:30 p.m. on weekends. Moderate. — N.W. (6/02)

EDGEWATER GRILL 861 W. Harbor Drive, Seaport Village, 619-232-7581. An easy walk from the Convention Center, the dining room is spacious and handsome, and the view from the crowded dining terrace is optimal (the bay, the Coronado Bridge, a park, etc.). The menu, though, is convention-centered — like a Howard Johnson's for the 21st century. The fare features middle-of-the-road faux-fusion salads, seafood, grilled steaks, pastas (most with shellfish), and individual pizzas, plus daily fin-fish dishes listed on a card in a plastic holder on the table. The lighter dishes are the most successful this is not a bad place to "graze" on appetizers and a mini-pizza when you're starved for a view. Difficult wheelchair access to terrace. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Entrées high moderate to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

GREYSTONE 658 Fifth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-0225. The Italian steakhouse fare here centers on dry-aged prime beef, game meats (including exceptionally tender bison), lobster, and pastas as the main draws, with indifferent starters and desserts. An impressive wine list offers rewarding California and Italian bottlings at \$35 to \$50, but roars up to the strato-sphere of first-growth Bordeaux, su-per-Tuscans and scandalously overpriced Napa reds. Bossy, sometimes-abrasive waiters push higher-priced choices. Patrons are mainly "suits" with deep expense-ac-count pockets, loudly talking business or enjoying raucous office parties in a testosterone-high atmosphere. Wheelchair access to the street patio and bar area only (dining rooms are up or downstairs). Reservations urged, but may not be honored promptly. Dinner nightly. Extremely expensive. – *N.W.* (12/01)

KANSAS CITY BARBECUE 610 West Market Street (at Harbor Drive), downtown, 619-231-9680. Scrumptious smells waft across the tracks at the Seaport Village trolley stop becued pork and beef. And yeah, this is the joint where Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis did their "sleazy bar scene" in Top Gun. And it is kinda sleazy, especially in the shadowy horseshoe bar, with memorabilia like hanging bras, Czech license plates, and stickers ("Grow Your Own Dope: Plant A Man"). The beef and pork ribs (or rib

tips or chicken breast) are worth it. They're cooked over an oak-fueled fire. Nice long Happy Hour (3:30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., at bar only) has great food/grub deals. Open daily, lunch until late, serving until 1 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (3/01)

LA GRAN TAPA 611 B Street, downtown, 619-234-8272. Here is a good spot for a light meal, especially before or after a cultural event. Tapas, Spanish appetizers, are prepared hot or cold, and the seafood, such as shrimp in sherry sauce and fresh octopus, is always fine. Try tortilla española (cold potato and egg "pie") and paella. Lively, casual atmosphere. Open Monday through Saturday. Inexpensive to expensive. — E.W. (1/99)

PETE'S QUALITY MEATS 1742-1/2 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-1684. Pete's Meats was just a butcher's shop until Pete's daughter and sister-in-law got the idea to set up a grill there. Now aficionados line up for Sicilian specialties like Italian-sausage sandwiches, steak sandwiches, and especially *spi-tini*— veal rolled around two cheeses, onions, tomatoes, pine nuts, currants, parsley, prosciutto, and breadcrumbs. Pete stuffs all of that into a hot bun with marinara sauce, sautéed peppers, and onions as packing. Nuff said? Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

POKEZ MEXICAN RESTAURANT **AND VEGETARIAN CUISINE** 947 E

Street (at 10th Avenue), downtown, 619-702-7160. Rafael — his buddies call him Rafa — started this cool student/artist hangout years ago when he was 18. Lunchtime business people come here. Evenings, seems like it's all Rafa's friends: people from downtown, Golden Hill, City College. The food is mostly Mexican vegetarian (though he's got meaty things like chicken or steak ranchero or sautéed chicken fajitas). Tip well: the servers volunteer and share the take from the gravy pot. Three meals weekdays; closes earlier on weekends. — E.B. (12/01)

REI DO GADO CHURRASCURIA 939 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-8464. The meats just keep on coming at a Brazilian *rodizio*: skewer after skewer of churrasco (Brazilian barafter skewer of *churrasco* (Brazilian barbecue), a near-endless procession of rotisserie-grilled meats and poultry. At each table there's a wooden cone with one end red and the other end green. Turn the green side up to start the servers parading to your table, offering you tastes cut from long spits of salty, simply seasoned pork, poultry, ribs, sausages, and numerous cuts of beef. Turn the cone red side up to take a break from the protein parade. The gargantuan spread includes a buffet in the front of the restaurant with a changeable array of alluring side dishes, salads, fruit, and such intriguing hot entrées as Brazilian oxtail stew or seafood in coconut milk, with exotic but oddly comfortable flavors. There's always a potful of *feijoada*, the national dish — slow-cooked, meaty black beans (in a somewhat bland version, which you can liven up with a splash of hot sauce).

No matter how often you eat here, you'll never have the same meal twice. Reservations advisable for weekends. Full bar (have a *Caipirinha*). No dog-gie-bags. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate (considering the food amount); prices higher on weekends. — *N.W.* (10/02)

TOP OF THE MARKET 750 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-234-4867. The upper-crust upper floor of the downtown Fish Market (see Multiple Locations listing) has largely the same food as the downstairs, plus a few luxury items (e.g., abalone) and occasionally some creative appetizer specials. Prices are about 25% higher for identical items, in exchange for a slightly elevated view and a dressier, white-tablecloth setting that's almost "formal" by San Diego standards flip-flops and tank tops (on men) aren't allowed, and collared shirts (e.g., polos) are suggested at dinner. That doesn't mean that the atmosphere is quietly gracious — the room's just as huge, packed, and raucous as the lower realms, even on the terrace. Reserve, and expect a short wait anyway. Elevator provides wheelchair access. Open daily. Expensive. — N.W. (9/01)

THE WESTGATE GOURMET DELI-CATESSEN Third Avenue, between Broadway and C Street, downtown, 619-557-3698. This is where you take your respectable Aunt Martha for lunch. The place reeks of gentility. Green carpets, white linen cloths, fresh flowers, chandeliers, giant potted palms. It's part of the Westgate hotel, and looks like a grocery for the rich who just can't live without specialty olive oils and expensive wines. But prices for sandwiches, light breakfasts, and lunches are down there with the best Market Street liquor-deli. The Hawaiian chicken salad (with walnuts, pineapple, chutney, fresh seasonal fruits, and non-fat mayo) is filling and healthy. But the best deal is the soup and half-sandwich combo, especially the Friday cioppino: a tomato-based soup filled with fish such as sea bass, shrimp, shark, lobster, and scallops. Open Monday through Friday for breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. -E.B. (9/01)

WILDSIDE CAFE & REBEL JUICE **BAR** 1048 Seventh Avenue, (at C Street), downtown, 619-696-1466. Now here's a place that actually makes

healthy food seem cool. Partly it's the names: "lunatic lentil soup," sand-wiches like "turkey tantrum" (roast turkey with salsa), "tuna scandal" (tuna mushed with egg whites and no-fat mayo), or our two favorites: "veggies on a bike" (cucumbers, spinach leaf, tomatoes, red onion) and "bagel without a cause" (bagel, cream cheese, fresh fruit). Actually, all come with fresh fruit. And do like the local lofties: take your daily shot of fresh-squeezed wheat grass juice with a chaser of strawberries or pineapple chunks. Open Monday through Friday, breakfast to late lunch; Saturday breakfast and lunch. Inex-

BINO'S EUROPEAN COFFEES AND CREPES 1120 Adella Avenue (just off Orange Avenue), Coronado, 619-522-0612. This little round-thecorner café (south of the Post Office) has to be good: it's a favorite retreat for local chefs. Bino bakes his own breads and croissants daily and creates great crunchy sandwiches. Try the Brie Fan-tasy (chicken breast, roasted marinated peppers, double cream Brie cheese) or the roast beef and jack cheese. Even the veggie sandwich squishes with luscious eggplant, and the crepes are delicious and filling too. Bino's wife is Austrian and makes great Viennese-style coffee. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

ISLAND WOK 922 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-6835. This tiny indoor-outdoor-takeaway café is a standby with locals, especially the high school crowd. It serves good Viet-namese-Chinese food, and plenty of it. The owner, Xuan, makes scrumptious fresh (not fried) Vietnamese spring rolls wrapped in rice paper with shrimp, pork, or chicken and vegeta-bles in the middle. But most customers go for the steam-table combination plates. You always get chow mein, fried or steamed rice, and a fried spring roll to start off, and then you can add entrées like orange chicken, kung pao chicken, or sweet-and-sour pork. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

JADE HOUSE CHINESE RESTAU-**RANT** 569 H Street (at Broadway), Chula Vista, 619-426-5951. Fairly barebones, but comfortable, decorated with red dragons and paper lanterns. William and Anna, cook-owners from Hong Kong, seem to change the re-volving "All U Can Eat" lunch buffet dishes quicker than you can say "Refills!" Kung pao squid, beef with broccoli, orange beef, and fried yam are great, but hang in for (in my opinion) the star turn: William's batter-covered crab puff - imitation crab with cream cheese. Or go with the menu and try the Pu Pu Appetizer Tray (for two) including fried shrimp, crab puff, and paper-wrapped chicken with flaming habachi. Seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

L'ESCALE Coronado Island Marriott Resort, 2000 Second Street, Coronado, 619-435-3000. This is the casual dining room that faces the pool at this firstrate hotel. Menus are constantly changing, so call to discover what type of cuisine is available. Jazz night on Friday and Saturday evening, with dinner specials. Open daily, breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — E.W.

MARCO'S FINE ITALIAN FOOD **AND PIZZA** 736 Palm Avenue (at 7th Street), Imperial Beach, 619-424-3636. You hardly notice it tucked into a row of TV repair shops, but Marco's is a iewel. Marco, Frank, and Rosa Palombo ran the place for 30 years. Now Alex Pacheco does, but nothing has changed. There are the classic red tablecloths, murals of Italian scenes, white trellises, dripping plastic grapes, and Chianti bottles. Try spaghetti, mostaccioli, or rigatoni with meat sauce and meatballs. Three meals, six days; Sundays, dinners only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

MARY I'S CAFE 1930 Cleveland Ave nue, National City, 619-477-6645. Mary J and her café have been around for 40 years and about the only thing to change is the prices. This is the real National City. The regulars start piling in at 5 a.m. Mary always has specials go-ing, but check the big board menu above the stove too. One of their most popular items is the Trucker's Breakfast (three eggs, ham, bacon or sausage, home fries, and toast), or steak and eggs with hash browns and toast. Mary's son Vic, the morning cook, always gives you more than enough. For lunch or early dinner, try the meat loaf with mixed veggies, boiled potatoes covered with gravy, toast, and soup or salad. Or chicken-fried steak with all the fixings. Also hefty: cheeseburgers or tuna melts (with fries plus soda included in the price) and that old American favorite, a fried egg sandwich with chips. Open 5 a.m. to 6 p.m, weekdays only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (6/02)

MCDINI'S 105 East 8th Street, National City, 619-474-6771. A historic, sprawling bar with a diverse, mellow family scene — all ages, all races, chatting, playing pool, cozying up to the all-encompassing jukebox, or smoking under a roofed front "patio." Or chowing down on industrial-grade pub grub, made largely of restaurant-supply products (including the vaunted corn

Traditionally, Hell's Angels visited it on their north-south tour of California's oldest bars. In 1993, Linda, the latest owner, added the romantic "Moonlight On The Sea" moniker. She prepares and hand-rolls her own mpia, and it shows. It has a nice fresh veggie, marinated-meat taste. And of course the grilled cheese sandwiches, wings, cheeseburgers, and dinnertime doubleburgers fit right into this wonderful throwback bar. Lunch, dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/02)

(The prefix for all Tijuana numbers is 011-52-664. From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit num-

EL RODEO 1647 Blvd. Salinas, Tiiuana, 686-5640. Steak lovers will have a field day here with a variety of cuts, some cooked right at your table. The accompaniments are wonderful: an appetizer and quesadilla, a crisp salad, beans served in their own liquid even a dessert is included in the price of the entrée. Cheese soup, burritos, and tripe are also available. *Vaquero* decor, wood-paneled rooms. Good value if you like beef. Open daily from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Take Revolución until it bends to the left to become Agua Caliente: turn left just before the twin high-rise towers, and left again, onto the one-way street, Blvd. Salinas. El Rodeo is on the right side of the street. Highly visible and easy to find. Moderate. — *E.W.*

LA COSTA 8131 Galeana (Seventh Street between Revolución and Constitución), Tijuana, 685-8494 or 685-3124. An extensive menu, consistently fresh product, and huge portions have made La Costa the reigning seafood house for Americans. Identical lunch and dinner menus offer lobster, shrimp, grilled fish, fish with sauces, squid, abalone, and oysters, all in a variety of preparations. Price of entrées includes soup, salad, rice, dessert, bev-erage, and after-dinner drink. Almost always crowded. Open Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 11 p.m.; Friday through Sunday, 10 a.m. to midnight. Moderate to expensive. — E.W.

ORIGINAL ORTEGA'S In Puerto

Nuevo, next to Casa de la Langosta, on the first street to your left (Calle Principal) after entering town through the entry gate. Open since 1952, this is the original "Lobster Village" restaurant, and not much has changed. Eventually Ortega's grew into an octopus with multiple arms in Puerto Nuevo and Rosarito Beach, all pretty similar. The menu is longer than most, with numerous starters (including a tasty ceviche and an excellent tortilla soup), varied seafood entrées and antojitos, desserts, and even fancy coffees (including "Viagra," which features reputedly aphrodisiac Damiana herbal liqueur). The spiny lobsters (once local but now from who-knows-where) are first fried in lard, then finished off on the grill, and served with a greasy-tast-ing melted "Kitchen Maid" margarine blend, frijoles, rice, tortillas, and salsa. Full bar, English menu, staff marginally bilingual. Moderate to high, but with low-moderate specials. No reserva-tions, cash only. — N.W. (11/02)

ROSTICERIA LOS POLLOS Avenida Constitución, between 6th and 7th Streets, Tijuana. Relatives of prisoners in the Tijuana jail (one block south) come here to buy treats for their locked-up loved ones. The cops come too, for the cinnamon-flavored fried chicken. Think KFC, but a little sweeter. And with more variety: You can eat just chicken necks if you want (Their meat slips down like salty fried

ovsters.) Fach plate comes with corn tortillas, and a bowl of wicked red salsa. Ask for Alejandro. He brought the idea up from Mexico City. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

TAURINO STEAKHOUSE 7531 Sixth Avenue (off Revolución), Tijuana, 685-7075. Located in the heart of the old section of Tijuana, three blocks west of Revolución, this restaurant pro-vides superb value in an excellent setting. Basically a steakhouse, it also of-fers fish, seafood, and fowl. The price of the entrée includes grilled quail, soup or salad, and mammoth amounts of the main course. Almost everyone orders *cabreria*, or try *empapelado*, fish and shrimp cooked in silver foil. Superior service. The menu is printed in Spanish and English, and the maitre d' speaks perfect English. First-rate bargain for high quality. Open daily, noon to midnight. Continuous service. In expensive to moderate, except for lobster. — E.W.

VALLARTA NATURAL 1252 Boule vard Agua Caliente, Tijuana, 686-1560. Vallarta Natural makes travel to Tijuana really appetizing, serving only the healthiest, freshest ingredients. The kitchen makes its own bread and rolls, soy chorizo, vegetable stock, and gluten daily. Recommended are goblets of fresh juice, caldo tlalpeño soup, taquitos panzones (soft tacos) filled with sautéed mushrooms or soy chorizo, and especially *milanesa*. The *milanesa* is made from fresh gluten and is almost indistinguishable from veal — breaded, fried, it is delicious. Cool, clean, pleasant atmosphere. Open daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (9/98)

BUCA DI BEPPO 705 Sixth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-233-7272. Also at 10749 Westview Parkway, Mira Mesa, 858-536-2822. Family-style, Southern Italian cooking in a dining room seating 305 people. Food is simple (one sauce fits all), portions huge, and roaring-loud ambiance is child-and teenager-friendly. Go for plain fun, not gourmet dinners. Meatballs and spaghetti the best bet. Dinner nightly, lunch Sundays. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.W. (6/00)

JOE'S CRAB SHACK A seafood chain with a good Cajun corporate name (Landry's) based in southern Louisiana wouldn't survive without some pluses besides a Bourbon Street party atmosphere. Joe's is silly with crab-shack ambiance (campy nautical paraphernalia on down to souvenir gimme caps), but the food's not bad. One tasty starter is "crabioli," fried wonton stuffed with crab and melted cream cheese ("crab Rangoon" by another name, but smoother). You can choose buckets of steamed, barbecued, or garlic crab (of various subspecies), or go for fried or grilled seafood or steaks, or salads. Grownups may prefer the patio to the rockin', raucous interior. Full bar, not much wine. Inexpensive to low moderate. 7610 Hazard Center Drive, Mission Valley, 619-260-1111; 4325 Ocean Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-274-3474. — N.W. (5/01)

POPEYE'S CHICKEN & BISCUITS National City, 619-470-3002; 3489 Santo Road (at Aero Drive), 858-573-0035; Metropolitan Center, 1737 Euclid Avenue (north of Federal Boulevard), Chollas Creek, 619-527-6565; and 6095 El Cajon Boulevard (at College Avenue), 619-286-3322. This is the one major national chain to cling firmly to a regional American identity: Wherever you go, if you find a Popeye's, you'll be eating Louisiana flavors. But some flavors travel better than others in fast-food translations: The spicy, crisp fried chicken and air-light drop biscuits are fine as can be. The etouffee (whether of chicken or crawfish, when available) is surprisingly decent. The gumbo is weird—flavors aren't bad, but it's more like a Creole risotto, with wet rice instead of liquid (where's the soup?). Dirty rice and jambalaya are nasty and dry. Food quality varies subtly from branch

to branch, as does the attitude of the

counter-persons. Open daily, three

The List

A fine ear for the clichés, the jocularities, the pieties, the mendacities of social lubrication.

ithout preamble, the best movies I saw in 2002, by which I mean the best new movies, by which I mean the best movies new to our local theaters, by which I do not mean revivals or DVDs

or TCMs, in order of personal preference, but without further preamble, were Gillian Armstrong's *Charlotte*

Gray, Nanni Moretti's The Son's Room, Mike Leigh's All or Nothing, Zhang Yimou's Happy Times, Michael Moore's Bowling for Columbine, and Alexander Payne's About Schmidt.

I am aware that with my top choice, released in the media hubs at the end of 2001 and withheld from the hinterlands until the following calendar year, I have positioned myself outside the swim of things. So be it. The best is the best, and I am unafraid to swim without a buddy. An old-fashioned ungadgety espionage adventure (albeit one with feminist and Communist sympathies), set during the Second World War, Charlotte Gray had just about everything you (or I, anyhow) could want: expertly shaped scenes

that fitted together smartly and flowed smoothly, to give rise to mounting suspense, deepening emotion, widening wisdom, and an evolving portrait of a multidimensional and impressive heroine. What once would have been

called a movie-movie until, that is, the definition came to demand box-office receipts in the double-digit mil-

lions over the opening weekend. The movie had a decent run, though nothing to compare with the somewhat similar — in genre and in period — but otherwise mediocre *Enigma*.

The next best has been a little soured in memory, through no fault of its own, by Landmark's several abrupt postponements of its announced release date. My review eventually ran on the day I was departing on a three-week holiday in its country of origin, Italy, and one day before I had been absolutely, positively assured it would be opening. It in fact opened six weeks later. Local moviegoers do not bear all the blame for their dearth of interest in it. The movie, a study of loss and grief within



a middle-class family, could only benefit from comparison with its sensationalized and revenge-hungry American counterpart, *In the Bedroom.* Perhaps Miramax, the distributor of both, did not wish to encourage such comparison as Oscar night approached. Or perhaps viewers in major markets had already demonstrated a

dearth of interest in loss and grief without sensationalism and vengeance.

The next one, a typically toughminded Mike Leigh ensemble piece with peerless performances by Lesley Manville and Ruth Sheen in particular, left an even bitterer taste. Landmark, which had shown every Leigh film since 1988's *High Hopes*, did not merely postpone it (after it again was too late to hold my review) but cancelled it outright, shifting the responsibility for the decision onto its distributor, United Artists. That alibi was promptly shot full of holes when the film got picked up by Madstone, a new presence in town since August, and never a more welcome or purposeful one.

The bitterness nonetheless lingers. (Why should I have to turn blue in the face before the best movies can open?) Landmark, self-styled as "your year-round film festival," had supplied incontrovertible evidence that its dedication to its patrons, not to mention its dedication to Mike Leigh, weighed little alongside its dedication to making money. No one, admittedly, could dispute the film's lack of "hooks" — no hot sex, no gay theme, no quirkiness and edginess, no period costumes, no literary pedigree. No one, either, will need to point out to me that two out of every three of the movies on my list were brought to town by Landmark. No one needs to tell me what I owe.

Happy Times, a piteously human comedy to do with the improbable bond between a childish old bachelor and a neglected blind girl, would doubtless have had a happier time at the box-office had it had a happier ending. (I.e., a falser one.) Those who missed it missed one of the year's funniest films, for all its pathos, and one of the best-looking, too. Michael Moore's engagé and impertinent documentary on the causes and effects of violence in America was also a funny film (for all its anger), though not a good-looking one. Moore is one of those people whom you love, or like, or appreciate, or tolerate, or what-you-will, for the quality of his mind: grappling with large issues, failing utterly to subdue them, but putting up a good fight.

And tardily I add my voice to the chorus of approval on Alexander Payne's late-life-crisis comedy about a retired Omaha insurance executive who now begins to wonder what it was all about. (I note that the Golden Globes have categorized it as Drama, same as they did several years ago with Fargo, both of them "inside" jobs on the Midwest by native sons. Maybe these awards should be refashioned as the Golden Cubes.) As this is my first word on the subject, I can spare it a few extra words. Jack Nicholson may be too big a star, or too hip a one, in relation to his surrounding cast (chosen with care down to the smallest role), but you cannot fault his effort: his frog-on-a-lily-pad lethargy, his flatfooted waddle, his comb-over, his open embrace of humiliation, in total harmony with the understated grotesquerie around him. Much of the fun of the movie, much of the comic cushion against the harshness of its vision, is in seeing King Jack demean himself. Payne, a perfectly named if not perfectly spelled filmmaker, evinces a fine eye for the topographical and architectural barrenness of America's Heartland (what someone might see as a "visual correlative" of the hero's spiritual state), and a fine ear, as well, for the clichés, the jocularities, the pieties, the mendacities of social lubrication. The opening retirement party ("Nice event"), the invited but unwanted visit to the office of the hero's yuppie successor at Woodmen of the World Insurance, the funeral reception, the nautically minded tourist from Eau Claire ("Ahoy!"), and the climactic wedding bash are all on a par with the wickedest tortures devised by Ring Lardner or Sinclair Lewis. Some scenes, it's true, go too far; and the voice-over device whereby the hero pours out his heart in letters to his six-year-old Tanzanian foster child ("For years now she has insisted that I sit when I urinate") is as facile and as far-fetched as it is funny. To be more precise: very, very. (The spoken name alone — Ndugu -

is a push-button for laughs, no matter how many times it is activated.) I would have preferred that the ending be cut shorter for ambiguity, but while the teardrop and the smile might make things easier for seekers after a Bright Side, these emotional cues do not really clear up the ambiguity.

Honorable mentions: Mark Pellington's spookily unclassifiable tale of the supernatural, *The Mothman Prophecies*; a couple of credits to the science-fiction genre, Steven Soder-

bergh's cerebrally romantic Solaris and Andrew Niccol's boat-rocking backlot satire, Simone (was it just last summer that the latest Star Wars episode appeared, or was it only a bad dream?); a couple of cool French thrillers, Claude Chabrol's Merci pour le Chocolat and Laurent Cantet's Time Out, and a relatively cool American one by the sometime Frenchman Barbet Schroeder, Murder by Numbers, with its exquisite photography by Luciano Tovoli; a couple of Iranian imports,

par for the course in recent years, Majid Majidi's rhapsodic *Baran* and Babak Payami's droll and dry Secret Ballot; a couple of elegiac contemplations of mortality, Last Orders by Fred Schepisi and I'm Going Home by the nonagenarian Manoel de Oliveira; the convolutedly clever Adaptation, surely more the writer's film than the director's, Charlie Kaufman's more than Spike Jonze's; the somewhat schizophrenic Black Hawk Down by Ridley Scott, dazzling and grueling in equal measure; Werner Herzog's idiosyncratic Invincible; and, in case it was not on my 1998 list after its festival showing, Philippe de Broca's frolicsome On Guard. Things like Stephen Daldry's The Hours, Phillip Noyce's The Quiet American, and Douglas Mc-Grath's Nicholas Nickleby, still awaiting their local premieres, will have to wait till next year.

At this point I could spend some

time wringing my hands over movies I liked but perhaps might have liked a little more (e.g., Spirited Away, Secretary, Mostly Martha, The Rookie, Road to Perdition, Undercover Brother), or I could stoop to the task of singling out the worst of the worst (The Rules of Attraction, XXX, Full Frontal, Femme Fatale, Dragonfly, Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood, so many worthies from which to choose), but I opt instead to return one last time to Solaris, whose complete and shameful failure to draw a crowd was at least as significant a phenomenon as, say, the unstoppable box-office run of My Big Fat Greek Wedding, a TV sitcom waiting to happen. What is it in today's moviegoing climate that makes it so unthinkable that Solaris could have similarly "caught on"?

The answer to that question, however you care to phrase it, suggests a couple of alternative science-fiction

scenarios more familiar than that of Solaris. The first would be the one in which an alien of higher evolution and advanced learning lands on Earth, bringing along a message of enlightenment, only to be fired upon on sight by a narrow, conformist, hostile, and paranoid populace. (One wants to be careful here not to go overboard for Soderbergh in compensation: he, after all, made the aforementioned FullFrontal, too.) The second would be the more futuristic one — but maybe not as futuristic as we might like to think — in which the populace, over a long period of time (since Jaws and the original Star Wars, let's say), has been so brainwashed by the evil geniuses of the great corporations, so bred for stupidity, that when some free-thinking throwback emerges from the underground to exhort rebellion, the masses are no longer even capable of deciphering the intent, and can react only with apathy, puzzlement, ridicule. Here's a filmmaker who had all those millions at his disposal, all those sets, all those CG spacescapes, in addition to a major star under contract — and he forgot to put a movie onto the screen! (Forgot the perpetual motion, the flashing lights, the laser battles, the bug-eyed monster, etc.) What a sap! What kind of suckers does he take us for? And so the brainwashing and the breeding may press ahead with impunity (just listen to the hum of anticipation at the trailer for the forthcoming Daredevil), until the moviegoing masses have been reduced to such a state of infantilism

that they will be contented with a baby rattle shaken in their faces.

And a happy new year! ■

Adaptation — The reteaming of the writer and the director of *Being John Malkovich*, Charlie Kaufman and Spike Jonze, has produced no less madness but much more method. Or anyhow more meaning. Kaufman, playing fast and loose with the truth, evidently set out in reality (though it doesn't seem his sort of project) to do a screen adaptation of Susan Orlean's nonfiction best-seller, The Orchid Thief ("It's that sprawling New Yorker shit"), and ended up by writing himself and his creative torments into the script ("That's what I need to do: tie all of history together"). More precisely, what he wrote into the script was a fatter, balder, lonelier version of himself (Nicolas Cage, in a characterization of unsparing physical detail), together with an identical twin brother who is also a screenwriter, albeit a happy-go-lucky hack: not so much a separate entity as an alternative self or a divisive inner voice. In short. Kaufman found a way to make a movie out of a mess, or vice versa. The surviving movie is still very much a mess: two movies in one, with attendant

disruptions of momentum and shifts in tone. Susan Orlean remains in place as a central figure (played by Meryl Streep, whose director on *The River Wild*, Curtis Hanson, plays her husband), in tormented pursuit of her own story, that of a toothless redneck orchid cultivator (Chris Cooper, in his best role so far, and fully up to it). The $\,$ movie has much to say, and much of it quite funny, about such large subjects as the solitary struggles of the writer in front of the blank page (how soon can he take a break for a muffin, and what kind of muffin?), the tug-of-war between artistic integrity and commercial compromise, the hidden depths of people beneath their opaque surfaces. All of this, including the funniness, is not achieved without a mighty sense of strain. And no amount of winking self-awareness, postmodern irony, and impish impudence (Susan Orlean turns into a drug-trafficking homicidal adulteress) can lessen the disappointment of the climactic swerve into thriller-dillerdom, 2002.

Alias Betty — French thriller adapted from Ruth Rendell's *The Tree of Hands*, with Sandrine Kiberlain and Nicole Garcia, directed by Claude Miller.

(KEN, 1/3 THROUGH 9)

Analyze That — The obligatory token of respect and appreciation for 1999's *Analyze* This. In a word, the sequel, likewise directed by Harold Ramis. The revised concept: the vulnerable mobster gets himself released from prison, and into the custody of his former therapist, by singing the entire score of *West Side Story* nonstop. (Not only can Robert De Niro not carry a tune, he cannot get within arm's reach of one.) That mafioso who knows Broadway show tunes — sets the standard for the humor to come. (Somehow it's worse, not better, that he is *faking* his madness, and that he can call up the lyrics, if not the melodies, consciously.) The outtakes during the closing credits, albeit a hand-me-down idea, raise the standard considerably: always a bad sign Once again, the balance of attention, and even the balance of admiration, favors the mobster over the therapist, though you might hypothesize that Hollywood filmmakers on the whole would have a more intimate familiarity with the latter profession. On the other hand, they have made more money off the former. With Billy Crystal, Lisa Kudrow, Joe Viterelli.

The Birds — Hitchcock's shocker about an avian air attack on the citizenry of Bodega Bay is constructed along the lines of a sci-fi invasion film. Divested of all logic, this assault on middle-class complacency exposes Hitchcock's sadistic tendencies as nakedly as they have ever been. There is a lightening of load thanks to the absence of human villainy and all the creaky contrivance normally found in Hitchcock's depiction of it. At the same time, the director's stylistic devices - the intricate scene construction, the brilliant Pop Art color, the throwaway drolleries, the mugger's or molester's skill at leading easy victims into entrapment — have never been seen in better working condition. Bowling for Columbine — MichaelMoore's engaging and enraging documentary on gun culture in America, and by extension violence, homicide, and the climate of fear in America. Dishevelled as ever in his baggy clothes and collection of ballcaps (one of them emblazoned with "Writer"), usually unshaven, a definitive schlump, he is still his own protagonist, no matter how antagonistic a one. Here he is, selecting a free rifle as a bonus "gift" for opening a CD account at a heartland bank cum licensed firearms dealer. Here he is, testing the theory that Torontonians don't bother to lock their homes, by going right up to some front doors and opening them. (Canada comes off very well in the film, not just for the low murder rate among a wellarmed populace, but for the bedrock of social beneficence.) And here he is, escorting two crippled survivors of the Columbine school shooting to Kmart headquarters, to

"return" the bullets to their place of purchase. Surprisingly — you can see it plainly on his face — Kmart capitulates to the cease-and-desist demand, a tiny victory on Moore's quixotic quest to change the world. His search far and wide for connections and causalities, for an explanatory nexus, can at times resemble mental meandering. And he is not averse to the cheap shot and the heavy hand: a montage of U.S. foreign-affairs follies will be accompanied by Louis Armstrong's "What a Wonderful World." (Joey Ramone's sneeringly ironic cover version of the song will be heard in the closing credits.) Yet his sincerity, for all his showmanship and all his sarcasm, never seems in doubt. His lack of slickness may or may not say something about his level of expertise as a filmmaker. The film is not so much unslick as strategically and pragmatically anti-slick. Catch Me If You Can — Lightweight Spielberg (as compared, say, with the immediately preceding Minority Report, never mind Schindler's List or Amistad), an admiring, even envying portrait of a real-life teenage imposter and check forger in the late 1960s, Frank Abagnale, Jr. His excuse: his father's financial woes, his move to a new school, his broken home. His vindication: his millions, legal as well as illegal. (Plus his bond with his FBI pursuer, a bespectacled and Boston-accented Tom Hanks.) Leonardo DiCaprio, supposed to be fifteen at the earliest point, looks a little long in the tooth, taking something away from the hero's audacity. (Commemorated already in William Wellman's rambunctious Roxie Hart.) There's a good deal of frenetic cutting and hyperkinetic camerawork, as if in mortal terror of being taken for a stage play. And the dingy, dungeony image hardly recalls the genre's Technicolor glory days. Renée Zellweger and Catherine Zeta-Jones (it must be without precedent for the two top-billed stars of a movie to be so close to the end of the alphabet) do indeed sing and dance as advertised, and in Zellweger's case, even act. Lest she never again land a role as anything other than a prison matron, she also amply demonstrates that the pounds she put on for Bridget Jones are all gone now. Die Another Day — It is now (ahem) four decades since James Bond made his debut on screen, never mind another decade since his debut on the page: he must, as a film entity alone, be into his seventies by now. However you calculate it, he can ill afford to spend fourteen months in a North Korean prison, coming out afterwards looking like Robinson Crusoe, as he does at the beginning of this, the twentieth entry in the series, give or take a *Casino Royale* or a Never Say Never Again. If the opening bout of incarceration, torture, and disgrace ("Double-0 status rescinded") is meant to provide a jolt, it would have been advisable not to precede it with one of those preposterously overblown pre-credits sequences, or to accompany it with techno-Madonna all through the actual credits. The film is wrecked before it can get off the ground. There was perhaps cause for hope in the enlistment of a new director, Lee Tamahori (Once Were Warriors, Mulholland Falls, The Edge, Along Came a Spider), a cut above most of the recent helmsmen. Then again, the same could have been said about Michael Apted before the previous one, The World Is Not Enough. Bond proves again to be director-proof. In fairness, the secondbanana villain's getaway by helicopter from an islet off Cuba is excitingly staged, and there's a vigorous swordfight in the Flynn-Rathbone tradition between Bond (who never needs practice to stay in trim) and the top banana. But then there's the laser-ray satellite, the invisible automobile, the windsurfing on a tidal wave, the car chase through the melting Ice Palace, the cosmetic conversion of Asian to Caucasian, and so on. 
8 Mile — Screen debut of rapper Eminem, a pop-star acting vehicle not unlike some of the more serious (everything being relative) of the early Elvis vehicles: *Loving You, Jailhouse Rock, King Creole, Wild in the*

exclusive engagement STARTS FRIDAY

Country. (The Eminem character is even addressed on occasion as "Elvis.") On the score of "realism," one cannot fault the views of the ravaged urbanscape of modern Detroit (Michael Moore territory) or the trailer-park squalor of the hero's home life; and Eminem himself, who came out of this background, does nothing in his acting to dispel the illusion. But all this grit goes only so far to cover up a hip-hop Rocky centered around a blue-eyed, blue-collar rapper who freezes on stage during the opening "battle" — forty-five seconds apiece to trash an opponent in rhythm and rhyme — and who ultimately redeems himself in the climactic rematch. What happens in between is a sub-Scorsese series of scrapes and scuffles threaded together by a plotless blur of "What the fuck, man!" and "What's your fucking problem?" (Eminem, despite his runty size and his perpetual deer-in-theheadlights look of fright, holds his own in the physical battles, too.) And the grit, such as it is, never gets so thick as to blacken the rosy image of rap music as the voice of liberation: just what our Founding Fathers had envisioned for the disenfranchised youths of the inner cities. The un-PC 'gangsta" element has been all but eliminated, and although the personal vituperation in these "battles" leads naturally to challenges of an opponent's manhood — which lead naturally to imputations of homosexuality — our hero will not descend to such depths. He descends instead to the level of the gradeschool playground where a rival will be perceived as vulnerable on the basis that his given name is Clarence. As in Darrow. 

Evelyn — Fact-based sob story, set in the Fifties, about a hard-drinking, unemployed Irishman (Pierce Brosnan, whose brogue seems to raise his voice half an octave) whose children are taken away from him after his wife runs off with another man, and who must storm the fortress of Family Law in order to get them back: "David beat Goliath in the book I read." Every emotional punch is telegraphed, and every one is a haymaker. With Julianna Margulies, Aidan Quinn, Stephen Rea, Alan Bates, Sophie Vavasseur; directed by Bruce Beresford.

Far from Heaven — At the outset, Todd Haynes carries us on a crane over a Peyton Place-y town square (or square town) and into the glossy world of the 1950s "women's picture." It is mildly amazing how straight he plays it, or anyway how deadpan, although there are nonetheless as many laughs as there would be if a present-day audience were to sit and watch Imitation of Life or All That Heaven Allows, the two Douglas Sirk soapers that provide the most overt inspiration. One flagrant difference between this and those is the taboo subject matter that never could have seen the light of day on the old Universal Studios backlot: the struggles of a white-collar family man with his suppressed homosexuality ("I know it's a sickness, because it makes me feel *despicable*") and the possibility, if not the actuality, of a clandestine affair between a liberal-minded suburban housewife and her cultured "Negro" gardener. Somehow the director's deadpan does not hide every hint of his condescension, self-congratulation,

and higher evolution. Off screen, which is to say in interviews and in the press notes, he will insist on how relevant and universal as distinct from Universal — the material continues to be, but this might have been easier to swallow if he had updated the setting. When Rainer Werner Fassbinder paid his own homage to Sirk in Ali: Fear Eats the Soul, he made the same point, and made it better, by taking an old soapy story (All That Heaven Allows cross-pollinated with Imitation of Life — and clearly Haynes owes as much to Fassbinder as to Sirk) and then transplanting it into a thoroughly modern style and setting. Why could the point not just as well be made a slightly different, yet slightly more daring, way: by transporting an old story along with the old style into a modern setting? While it is well photographed (Ed Lachman), well designed (Mark Friedberg), well costumed (Sandy Powell), and well acted (Julianne Moore, Dennis Quaid, Dennis Haysbert), the film has a dollhouse quality that stiffens it, flattens it, squeezes the life out of it. Perhaps there's significance in the fact that Haynes's name-making first film, Superstar: The Karen Carpenter Story, was enacted entirely with Barbie dolls. What had seemed at the time a budgetary limitation might be a bigger limitation. 2002.

Frida — Belated contribution to Fridamania. The same-named 1984 film by Paul Leduc, while timelier, was too low-profile to discourage additional spotlight-seekers and altar-worshippers. So now we have a new chiselled Frida Kahlo (Salma Hayek), an almost Manneristically elongated one, to grace the cover of the paperback reprint of Hayden Herrera's definitive biography, and to obstruct our view of the real woman. The movie unmistakably works a kind of magic (not to say "magic realism") in the transformation of so fascinating a life, so lavishly re-created and so lusciously photographed, into something so dull and ordinary. Certainly we might have expected some visual pyrotechnics from director Julie Taymor, who had shaken up Shakespeare in *Titus.* And for sure, Taymor pulls out all the stops for the grisly trolley accident that crippled the artist in her youth (though she's dancing a tango before you know it). And her voyage to New York — otherwise known as the Invasion of Gringolandia will be done as an animated collage of paper cutouts, with her muralist husband, Diego Rivera, scaling the Empire State Building as King Kong. For the rest, this is a surprisingly

pedestrian "biopic," in the subgenre of Tormented Artist, endlessly relating the marital infidelities and blow-ups ("My goddam sister! You're an animal!"), and casting only passing glances at the oh-bythe-way paintings. Taymor, in effect, is like the socialite who attends a gallery opening only in order to gossip about the artist, and who can barely spare a moment for what's on the walls. The artwork is important to her, just as Kahlo's circle of friends is important to her, only to the extent that it confers a reputation. The movie counts on the cachet of the characters to compensate for the triteness and repetitiveness of the incidents. With Alfred Molina, Geoffrey Rush, Ashley Judd, Antonio Banderas, and Edward Norton, as Diego Rivera, Leon Trotsky, Tina Modotti, David Alfaro Siqueiros, and Nelson Rockefeller, in order. 2002.

Gangs of New York — Martin Scorsese's long-delayed, and just plain long, survey of Irish gangs in lower Manhattan during the time of the Civil War, Boss Tweed, and all that, beginning and ending in major blood baths, with minor blood rinses and sloshes in between. (It's not hard to see why the internecine discord in the New York melting pot was thought unsuitable for post-9/11 entertainment: "It wasn't a city, really," the lowborn narrator grandly philosophizes. "It was more a furnace where someday a city might be forged.") The wonder of it is that it's not more compelling. Indisputably, it has a lot going for it. It gives Scorsese, for a start, a new avenue down which to pursue his lifelong interest in thugs, specifically thugs of a different ethnicity (but same church), with such colorful group identities as the Dead Rabbits, the Plug-Uglies, the Slaughterhousers, the Little Forty Thieves, the Broadway Twisters, etc. It has history; it has sets; it has costumes (the Mad Hatter look was in vogue); it has flavorfully antique language; and it has a daring portrayal by Daniel Day-Lewis of a one-eyed underworld kingpin known as "The Butcher," who looks and acts like someone who would tie Pearl White to a train track and twirl the tip of his mustache while doing it. (Leonardo DiCaprio shrivels alongside him, in spite of his pumped-up new physique.) Yet in all these things the film has more a feeling of musty research than of pulsing life, and as a tale of revenge it seems static and monotonous. And please don't bring up Hamlet for precedent: the Prince of Denmark was not an eyewitness to his

father's murder, and he at least had the presence of mind to hash over his hesitation, and for all the flavor of the language here (from a trio of heavyweight screenwriters, Jay Cocks, Steven Zaillian, Kenneth Lonergan), it isn't Shakespeare by a long shot. Happy Accidents — Fey relationship comedy revolving around an unlucky-inlove New Yorker (Marisa Tomei) whose new suitor (Vincent D'Onofrio) claims to be a "back traveller" from the year 2470, where, it develops, he had fallen in love with a photograph of her (how romantic!) and whence he has come to rescue her from an untimely death: or more cosmically, to "break the causal chain." The camerawork of filmmaker Brad Anderson is not as aggressively annoying as in his Next Stop, Wonderland, but it's still restless and rocky enough to make you wish you could get your hands on the time traveller's stash of Dramamine. 2001.

Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's **Stone** — The children's book by J.K. Rowling, now a movie by Chris Columbus — maker of, among others, Adventures in Babysitting, Home Alone, Mrs. Doubtfire, Nine Months, Stepmom, and Bicentennial Man, chief rival of Steven Spielberg for his in-touchness with the Inner Child. No longer applicable, quite plainly, will be the line of defense to the effect that, however good or bad it might be, the kids at least are reading it, reading something. Even if you haven't read it yourself, you can infer a slavish fidelity to the text on the grounds that no special-effects movie, no "event" movie, no movie scored by John Williams, would otherwise keep so leisurely and strung-out a schedule of dramatic incident. It's more a matter of going new places and meeting new people (or new owls, goblins, trolls), a social schedule. The bespectacled little hero, if you didn't know, is a put-upon

In the end, his plodding path will lead him to a confrontation with the evil entity who slew his parents. But this destination is not signposted with the efficiency or urgency of a Hamlet (for instance). Maybe admirers of the book will be content with what amounts to an ancillary text of lavish illustrations. Still, it's not the, or a, book. More bluntly, it's not anything special. More simply, the storytelling is terrible. (Yeah, sure, the technology is terrific.) The question does not ask whether she can be America's Sweetheart (which, owing to her career choices to date, and despite the cuteness of her giggle, her nose-scrunch, her accent, etc., seems very much out of the question), but rather whether she can have a mega-hit on the scale of Julia Roberts. This question will chiefly be of interest to her business manager, her accountant, her agent, her publicist, perhaps her psychiatrist. The legitimate interest, meantime, of the critic and the casual moviegoer is the simple question of whether she can make a good movie, more exactly a movie concerned with something other than flattering its star. (Of course she made one of those, Blood and Wine, but that was before she became a star.) This particular Cinderella story casts her as a single-mom housekeeper at the four-star Beresford Hotel, with aspirations to a management position, but suddenly in jeopardy of losing everything after she tries on the Dolce & Gabbana pantsuit in the closet of the Park Suite, and the dishy and highly eligible State Assemblyman - Ralph



Rabbit-Proof Fence — Factual folk tale of three little half-caste girls who in the early 1930s, by authority of the Aborigines Act, were taken from their home and transported 1200 miles away to an "assimilation" camp, whence they promptly escaped and set out homeward on foot, using the titular structure - "the longest fence in the world" - as their road map. The assimilation policy, scandalously on the books into the 1970s, is no doubt deplorable, and as a dramatic subject, in consequence, it inspires easy indignation and self-satisfaction, as well as such dogeared images as the mother running tearfully alongside, and then collapsing in the dust, of the vehicle spiriting away her children. And Kenneth Branagh, as the prissy pen-pusher in charge of enforcing the policy, all too plainly relishes his blandly villainous lines: "In spite of himself, the native must be helped." (Director Phillip Noyce's subsequently shot but almost simultaneously released The Ouiet American, from the Graham Greene novel, ventures into grayer morality.) The trek itself makes an acceptable if unexciting adventure story, with the girls going through a variety of terrains and helpers. The Ring — Heavily hyped remake of a little-seen Japanese horror film follows around a Nancy Drew reporter (Naomi Watts) as she looks into the rumor of a

videotape that kills its viewers one week to the minute after they view it. She even looks at the tape herself after intrepidly tracking down a copy of it at the Shelter Mountain Inn, where four simultaneously deceased teenagers had stayed the week previous. (The video looks a bit like a product of the 1920s avant-garde cinema, but not necessarily lethal.) She then asks the appropriate journalistic questions: "Who made it? Where'd it come from?" She has exactly one week to find the answers. Directed by the chameleonic Gore Verbinski (Mouse Hunt, The Mexican), the film is rather poorly photographed in a nauseous bluey-green or a bilious greeny-blue, but is watchable all the same. Its emphasis falls more on detective work than on cheap thrills, and it offers some quietly creepy details (the housefly in the video which can be plucked off the screen in freeze-frame mode) as well as one hair-raising scene of a panicked horse running free on a ferry. It even has a satisfactory if incomprehensible ending, before it presses on mandatorily to a less satisfactory and no more comprehensible second ending. The Santa Clause 2 — There's a lot

going on, probably too much: the son of Father Christmas has landed himself on the Naughty List and requires some emergency parental attention; a contractual codicil dictates that the incumbent Santa must leave office if he fails to find a Mrs. Claus by Christmas Eve; in Santa's absence from the North Pole, a plastic facsimile of him (a fascinating make-up job) oversteps his bounds into fascist tyranny; and the Tooth Fairy, unhappy over his name, is given a prominent supporting part. Each of these elements ends up getting short-changed. But altogether it's a serviceable holiday entertainment from Disney, in spite of the strain of wisenheimer irreverence that seems to have seeped over from the animation department. Molly Shannon contributes a show-stopping turn, suitable for Saturday Night Live, as a desperate blind date with Country-Western aspirations. The reunion of the original crew on the big screen, and the resumption of their exploits a decade after their TV cancellation, was something quite unique, and for a while quite vital. To attach them to their parasitic successors is to tarnish their legacy even further than they eventually tarnished it themselves. Granted, one of the nice things about a science-fiction "franchise," whether you look at it as one or two, is that the cast of characters is not just cannon fodder to be sacrificed to some ravening alien, as in most cinematic space operas. And this installment makes use of that fact to reach for an

Treasure Planet — An incohesive and indigestible blend of Robert Louis Stevenson and Robert Heinlein, besides an incohesive and indigestible blend of hand-drawn animation and CG stuff. The spaceships have masts and sails, like the flying pirate ship at the end of Peter Pan, except that these keep on going beyond the ionosphere, with the crew held to the deck by "artificial gravity." (Okay, but how about some artificial oxygen?) Most of RLS's memorable characters are present in one form or another: Jim Hawkins (a fatherless teenage daredevil with two-tiered, two-toned hair and a jet-powered surfboard), Long John Silver (a soft-hearted surrogate father), Dr. Livesey (prissified in the voice of David Hyde Pierce), Billy Bones (minus the Black Spot), Ben Gunn (a senile robot dubbed by Martin Short: "Was I ever dancing with an android named Lupe?"), in addition to a new Strong Female Character (in place of Capt. Smollett) and a comical shape-shifting mascot by the name of Morph (in place of the parrot): serious demographic oversights on Stevenson's part. LEAD STORIES

- A spokesperson for the Internet site offering "Kaboom: The Suicide Bomber Game" (the more bystander-victims, the more points) told The New York Times in December that the game had been played by computer users about 875,000 times since its introduction in April and is but one of several of the site's questionable-taste games based on contemporary events, including "Extreme WTC (World Trade Center) Jumper," 'Sniper's Revenge," and "Pico's School" (modeled after the Columbine, Colo., tragedy). Said the site's webmaster, "People...need to lighten up and realize there are far worse problems in the world than what games people are playing.' Singapore neurosurgeon Keith Goh and his colleagues said they would decide by the first of the year whether to attempt the unprecedented head-separating surgery requested by 28-year-old Siamese twins in Iran. Laleh and Ladan Bijani are law-school graduates who claim to need the separation because they have grown apart psychologically. "We have different lifestyles," said Ladan (the more extroverted). "We think very differently about issues."

America's Growing Gullibility Problem

- Administrators of the 162-year-old North Carolina state capitol authorized an inspection by the Ghost Research Foundation following years of disquieting complaints by security officers about middle-of-the-night "choral singing" and "door-slamming" (October). And in Dallas, Ruben Garces Moreno, 39, was convicted of killing his wife, motivated, he said, by the fact that a fortune teller had informed him that the wife had been unfaithful (November). And the inexplicably charismatic Judith Lynn Ashmore, 57, charged with fraud in August, was revealed to have enticed a family of four to accompany her on her four-month, eight-state crime spree by telling them first that she needed help with her terminal cancer and then that she was in a witness protection program.

Questionable Judgments

In Bennington, Vt., in October, Nicholas Perotta, 18, was charged with traffic violations that resulted in minor injuries to himself and two passengers in his Dodge pickup, caused when he collided with a utility pole. Perotta told police that there was a short-out in one of his stereo speakers and that he deliberately ran off the road seeking something to bump into in order to jar the speaker back into working order.

- According to testimony at the trial of Anastazia M. Schmid in Lafayette, Ind., in October, a motive for Schmid's having murdered her boyfriend, Tony Heathcote, was that she snapped during a consensual sexual bondage session with him when he allegedly suggested, "I'll be the daddy, you be the little girl." Unfortunately, Heathcote allegedly made that suggestion only two days after Schmid had learned that Heathcote had been accused of molesting Schmid's own six-year-old daughter. (She was convicted.) - In August (in Kenora, Ontario) and September (in Albuquerque), good-Samaritan motorists decided to pull over and offer help to police officers involved with traffic stops at the side of the road. The 27-year-old (unnamed) Ontario man was cited for DUI after he backed into the patrol car while parking, and the other Samaritan, Eddie Trujillo, 55, was cited for DUI after he badly slurred his earnest offer of assistance to the patrolman.

Unclear on the Concept

- John Perkyns, 48, who in September pleaded no contest to charges of destroying homosexual-themed books at two San Francisco libraries, also allegedly vandalized (as part of the same rampages) books by authors Gay Talese and Peter Gay and a book of poetry about the airplane that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima (the Enola Gay).

- An 18-year-old Winnipeg, Manitoba, high school student (not named in a Canadian press report) was let off easy on drug charges by Judge Cathy Everett, in that she sentenced him merely to write a report on the evils of the drug ecstasy. In December, he handed in a 24-page essay that began with the foreword, "All I ask is that [the judge] keep an open mind while reading this paper," and continued with a trashing of the concept of teaching drug abstinence (because it's only natural to be curious) and with detailed suggestions on how to take ecstasy safely and in moderation. The ever-tolerant judge ordered a rewrite.

Creme de la Weird

- In a still-unfolding story from Kassel, Germany, a man identified only as Armin M., 41, gave police a videotape in December showing him killing a 42-year-old companion who had answered Armin's Internet ad reading, "Gay male seeks hunks 18-30 to slaughter." Armin allegedly admitted that he is a cannibal and that he froze parts of the victim's body for later meals. According to police, the victim (an upscale professional) had methodically put his financial records in order before leaving his Berlin home to meet Armin, and according to one newspaper, the men are shown on tape eating the victim's penis, after he consented to castration. Armin also reportedly told police that he would never eat a woman because "they are too important for the survival of mankind." Stunned police investigators reportedly had to undergo psychiatric counseling after viewing the tape.

Recurring Themes

 Matt Boswell of Dallas apparently became the latest victim of thieves who make bad guesses about the value of packages they believe are worth swiping. In December, Boswell reported spotting a man rummaging through his truck, and when Boswell yelled, the man grabbed two containers and fled. As Boswell later explained to a Dallas Morning News reporter, the containers held pickups from customers of Pet Butler, Boswell's pet-waste-removal service (advertised by signs on both sides of his truck).

Thinning the Herd

- A 19-year-old man was fatally shot in the forehead by his 17-year-old brother after sneering that the kid didn't have "the guts" to shoot him and mock-commanding him, "Shoot me, you (expletive deleted in the original story)" (Albuquerque, September). And a 23-year-old man, who had opened a van's sliding door and begun pelting cars and mailboxes with rocks as the van drove by, was killed when he fell out and hit his head (Clark County, Ore., August).

Our Civilization in Decline

- An official at Sundon Lower School (Bedfordshire, England) prohibited parents from videotaping the school's nativity play this year because she feared that photographs could somehow be commandeered by pedophiles (November). A priest, feuding about policy matters with the president of the local Church of the Holy Resurrection of Christ, pulled out a gun but accidentally shot himself in the foot (Lebanon, Pa., December). A computer records investigation by the Fox TV station in Seattle found that 347 fugitive felons in the Seattle area are routinely receiving state welfare benefits because law enforcement's computers can't access the Social and Health Services computers (December).

Also, in the Past Month ...

- The World Bar, in New York City's new Trump World Tower, introduced a \$50 cocktail: Remy XO, Pineau des Charentes, freshly pressed grapes, and a dash of liquid gold, among other ingredients. A 29-year-old man was arrested in possession of three homemade bombs, which he said he carried around in case he ran into al Oaeda terrorists (Twin Falls, Idaho), A 45-vearold man was sentenced to life in prison for the Pakistani crime of being a follower of a bogus prophet (Faisalabad, Pakistan). A jury put Landon D. May, 20, on death row for two 2001 murders. He'll join his father, Freeman May, condemned in 1995 for a murder he committed just after Landon was born (Lancaster, Pa.).





The Big Gray Lump

am an ageist. I don't like to admit I discriminate against or make assumptions about any group of people. But during the past year or so, I have discovered that I tend to think of older folks in a lump — a big gray lump, everybody alike, no distinguishing characteristics. Unless you call the inability to drive a car well a distinguishing characteristic.

On more than one occasion during the past year, I have found myself having the following exchange, or something very close to it, with one or another of my children. I will be driving my van toward school. I am late, as usual, to pick up my three girls. I steer the van out of our driveway and down the quiet street that leads

to the busier street that leads to school. Without warning, a white Cadillac or Lincoln Town Car will pull out of a side street. The lumbering boat of a car will be going approximately 15 mph in a 25 mph zone. "Come on, Grandpa," I say in an irritated voice. "Speed it up."

"Is that Grandpa?" four-year-old Johnny asks from the backseat. Johnny is confused. One of his grandfathers lives in Ohio. The other died almost two years ago.

"No, sweetie," I backpedal. "It's not Grandpa. It's just somebody else's grandpa."

"Whose grandpa is it, Mom?"

"I don't know. But I'm sure he's a very nice man," I tell Johnny. "He just needs to drive a little faster," I add to myself.

Last spring, my husband Jack and I took our kids to a Knights of Columbus spaghetti dinner at our local parish. We stood in line in the church hall and received white porcelain plates heaped high with steaming spaghetti doused in marinara sauce. We picked up side plates and filled them with crusty garlic bread and iceberg lettuce swimming in bottled Italian dressing. As Jack and I sat at one of the long tables and cut up spaghetti for Johnny and then-18month-old Ben, we chatted with various friends also cutting up spaghetti for toddlers or babies.

When the kids had eaten, they pushed away from the table and ran outside to play with their friends. As Jack and I gathered up plates and wiped up spilled fruit punch, I glanced at the table across from us. Two white-haired couples sat with heads together, chatting. They took turns telling stories and laughing. For a moment, time seemed to slow, and I saw the four older people not as part of the great gray lump but as individuals. "Oh, my gosh," I thought. "That could be Jack and me and Bill and Betsy [one of our closest couple friends] in 20 years talking about children off at college or getting

The moment passed. We finished clearing the table and went back to chasing children.

I thought about that moment in the church hall a few weeks ago. The first week in December, I sat with my mother in the lobby of a retirement community near our home in San Marcos. My mother, who celebrated her 70th birthday almost a year ago, has decided to move out of her house in Pacific Beach. In the almost two years since my father's death, my mom has wrestled with the decision about what to do with the rest of her life. As long as I've known her, my mother has taken care of other people. She raised four children. She helped take care of my grandparents before they died. She took care of my father through a long illness. For the first time in her adult life, she had the opportunity to decide what she really wanted to do.

Which is how we found ourselves in the retirement community lobby last month. The room was painted in pinks and vellows and decorated for Christmas. An explosion of red poinsettias filled the window boxes. The smell of evergreen and cinnamon and eucalyptus radiated from the elaborate wreaths and floral table arrangements. My mother and I sat on a flowered chintz sofa and waited for the activity director to give us a tour. My mom had spent the previous week touring retirement communities in North County with my sister. She had decided she liked this one best. "Are you excited?" I asked.

"This is a corny word," she told me, "but I feel joyful."

Tears welled in her eyes. I found myself reaching for a tissue.

"I've gotten so isolated living in the house," she continued. "And there are so many things I can't do for myself anymore. I have to have the handyman come over to change the lightbulbs in the overhead lights because I'm not steady enough to stand on a step stool."

"And you won't have to cook or clean anymore," I added.

"I won't have to cook or clean anymore," she agreed. "And there are so many activities here."

As if on cue, the activity director walked across the lobby and greeted us. A few minutes later, she unlocked the door to my mother's new apartment. Late-morning light spilled through a large window into the living area. "This is so pretty," I told my mom.

She smiled. I couldn't help feeling joy-


