When it was announced in March that Kristin Shott, a 36-year-old welder at the Naval Air Depot on North Island, had won an award for blowing the whistle on a long history of faulty welds made by unqualified tradesmen working on the pride of America's carrier fleet, the USS Abraham Lincoln along with the Stennis, the Constellation, and the Nimitz — the Navy quickly launched a campaign of damage control.



Madaffer, both called to testify before a grand jury hearing evidence in the

case, are also listed as honorary hosts, along with Mayor Dick Murphy and ex-councilman Harry Mathis, a big backer of the Chargers ticket guarantee. Another honorary host is Democrat William Rosendahl, who's listed as chairman of the California Commission on Tax Policy, which has of late been talking about levying a new 8 percent state tax on home satellite TV service. The rub: in real life Rosendahl just happens to be an executive with the country's fifth-largest cable TV operator, Adelphia Communications. City hall lobbyists Jim Milch and Lou Wolfsheimer — whose clients once included the California Cabaret Association, which lobbied to water down the so-called six-foot no-touching rule at local strip clubs - are also listed as supporters of Peters, who is facing an incipient recall movement. Meanwhile, over in Las Vegas, federal campaign records show that Galardi gave \$5000 to the Nevada State Democratic Party last September. Paulina Galardi of Las Vegas also gave \$5000 on the same date. A \$1000 Mike Galardi contribution to the Republican congressional campaign of Lynette Boggs McDonald, a Las Vegas city councilwoman, was returned in December ... Ralph Inzunza Sr., father of the embattled San Diego councilman, is president of a new nonprofit corporation formed just last month, according to state records: San Diego and Imperial County Development Initiative ... As cops and controversy swirled around Cheetahs, Mike Galardi's other San Diego establishment, the Bull Pen, was quiet last week. Located in a strip mall across the parking lot from his strip club, the baseball-themed sports bar offers customers a bank of televised games from around the country and a \$5 chicken burrito at lunch. Said to be a former player in school and big Padres fan, Galardi sold a Cardiff beach house to Padres star Ryan Klesko back in July 2000 for more than \$1 million.

SAIC-TV La Jolla's Science Applications International Corp., the big defense con-

tractor, has received a \$45 million contract to set up Baghdad's first post-Saddam television station and U.S.-friendly newspaper, reports PR Week. SAIC's twice-weekly paper, al Sabah ("The Dawn"), produced by once-exiled Iraqi journalists in conjunction with American "Psychological Operations" agents, has an initial press run of 50,000 copies. The new TV channel offers a 30minute nightly news show reportedly explaining the capital's lawlessness and the lack of power and water under occupation ... The San Diego Chamber of Commerce usually stages its monthly "Business After Five" mixer at a bar or other commercial establishment. Next month, though, the cocktail party moves to the San Diego Hospice: "This popular event draws 200+ people who are serious about expanding their business connections!"... Rancho Santa Fe's Wally Schirra, the 80-year-old ex-astronaut, had harsh words for his old bosses last week in Palm Springs. "I think they have lost sight of their safety programs," Schirra told the Press-Enterprise. "We have an expression we all use in aviation," he said. "It's



for a controversial pedestrian bridge into Tijuana and has managed to latch on to at least \$20 million in subsidies from San Diego's redevelopment agency. Now comes word that Marasco and his financial partner, Virginia-based J.E. Roberts Co., are attempting to sell a big chunk of the shopping mall for \$85 million. According to Real *Estate Alert*, the 360,000-square-foot parcel is on the block, as well as a separate equity stake in the mall's second phase, for \$35 million ... Randolph E. Ward, San Diego Unified School District chief Alan Bersin's first choice to replace outgoing chief of staff Terry Smith, has turned him down, insiders report. Ward, currently state trustee of the Compton Unified School District, did not respond to messages left on his answering machine.

Anything Goes." Cole Porter wrote the music and lyrics. But it became San Diego's theme song. We don't yet know

if any city councilmembers solicited bribes or improperly took money from stripclub operators wanting looser laws. But we do know that in recent years, San Diego's corporate/government power structure has been conducive to palmgreasing.

Government at various levels has sent out the message that it was not going to peer under the table to see what was passing from the fat-fingered to the sticky-fingered.

Pelf passer and pelf payee had few reasons to believe that they would be detected, and if detected, that they would be prosecuted. Apologists say the mentality grew out of the city's desire to be known as business-friendly. Others blame law-enforcement lethargy. But the wise describe it as a rancid environment breeding corruption.

Two women new to their offices, U.S. Attorney Carol C. Lam and District Attorney Bonnie M. Dumanis, have a chance to reform this dirty old boys' network. With luck, the next city attorney will straighten out that office, too.

Consider campaign-finance abuses. Earlier this year, the grand jury, citing a story by the *Reader*, said that between 1996 and 1999, a full 476 complaints on campaign finance were referred to the city attorney's office, *continued on page 6*

Tijuana's Elderly Orphans

By Ernie Grimm

ast winter's rains have greened the empty fields and rutted the dirt roads of La Gloria. The area, on the southern outskirts

of Tijuana along the free road to Ensenada, is an odd mixture of waning agriculture and waxing wealth. Beside olive groves long untended stand brightly colored mansionettes surrounded by high walls with heavy iron gates. Across the street from one such abode sits the Agnes Lester home for the elderly.

Four nuns of the Carmelites of the Sacred Heart based in Guadalajara run the facility, which is home to 28 seniors. Some were placed there by their families who could no longer care for them. "And then there are others," explains Sister Alicia Gomez, "that don't have any relatives, or there is no way to find out if they have any or not. They live on the street or at the bus stations, living under horrible conditions."

Then there are the least fortunate of the Agnes Lester residents; those who have family but were abandoned by them. Sister Gomez is an energetic woman in her late 30s with light-brown eyes and the happy countenance of a woman who has spent her life serving others. But her usual smile disappears when she speaks of abandoned elderly. "It's an ongoing problem," she says. "Their own relatives sometimes kick them out, they sell their property out from under them, and then they just want to get rid of them."

Sister Gomez says the home receives "several calls each week from social workers, the police, hospitals" seeking to place abandoned *personas mayores.* "They find them," she explains, "and they don't know where to take them."

Margarita Williams is a social worker for the Tijuana branch of the federal agency Desarollo Integral de la Familia ("integral development of the family"), known universally in Mexico by the acronym DIF (pronounced deef). She works with the elderly and, when asked, acknowledges that Tijuana has a problem with elderly abandonment, "We get a lot of reports, either from relatives or neighbors, that there is an elderly person either being abused, neglected, and sometimes abandoned."

She adds, "It's the same all around Mexico."

But Sister Gomez thinks the problem of abandoned elderly is more of a border phenomenon. "Because there is a lot of migration," she explains, "there are people that

closes her eyes and shakes her head slowly, "who insists on seeing her son. She keeps her bags packed because she thinks her son is coming to pick her up any day. But in reality what happened is, three years ago, the son kicked her out, sold her house, and then left for the United States. It's very sad." *continued on page 13*

Big Pyramid Kills Special Forces

By Jim Morris

The spirit of Special Forces remains the same and, for the most part, so does the organization. However, minor changes have

had far-reaching effects and serve as brilliant examples of the Law of Unintended Consequences. As in algebra, when you change one factor in an equation, you change the entire equation.

Removing the first lieutenant as second-in-command from the A team, the Operational Detachment Alpha, and putting in a warrant officer is usually hailed as a good change. A warrant officer is a kind of officer/specialist, usually an expert in some technical field. They are not commissioned officers. They have officers' privileges, but are outside the usual lieutenant-captain-majorcolonel-general officer's rank structure. The warrant officer is more seasoned than a

young lieutenant and knows a hell of a lot more about Special Forces.

My concern would be that now officers enter Special Forces as captains, a higher rank than either lieutenant or warrant officer. The commander of an A team is a captain, which means that the commander of the A team is always the new guy. Sure, he's a seasoned officer, but SF is different. If he's not assertive, he runs the risk of becoming the operations sergeant's liaison with the officer's corps. If he's very assertive, he runs the risk of issuing a lot of stupid orders, which will make 11 smart guys hate his guts. If that happens he won't survive.


Relations in SF between

officers and NCOs are different from the rest of the Army. For one thing, if a seasoned SF NCO isn't an officer, it's because he doesn't want to be. The NCOs are as smart as the officers and know their jobs as well or better than the officers know theirs. They've just made a decision to avoid the politics that is inherent in being an officer.

The whole time I commanded an A team I never gave an order. We just sort of discussed how we wanted things to work, over dinner, or inspecting the camp. A loose rein is best with ten prima donnas and one lieutenant. If these young commanders stay out of their teams' way, they'll do fine.

But they won't be the guiding light of the team. The team sergeant is all about the team, but the CO should be all about the mission: His analysis of the operational area, his assessment of the enemy, his concept of operations. That should be the framework.

With the captain being the new guy, and communi-

cations with the next-higher headquarters so good, the captain ceases to be an entrepreneur and becomes a manager.

My former medic, now

an officer and friend, describes it thus. "The death of us has been the creation of a full-blown command, with concomitant layers of official bureaucracy, which has killed a lot of initiative. There is an overbearing burden of risk assessments and pre-approval requirements, by everyone, before anything can get done. This snuffs even the simplest of training plans before they can leave the team room. And operations? Fergitabowtit! If there's a hint of risk, the aversion is like the black plague.

"As for the warrant thing, a double-edged sword. They often compete with the captain for power, and the entire warrant program has been downgraded by the fact that a guy can now apply straight out of the 'Q' [qualification] course and get fast-tracked through courses without the benefit of commensurate experience. In other words, just like a lieutenant, who, if selected, put through the basic schools, and then through the 'Q,' brings the same as the warrant officer, with a few bennies. A major bennie is $\overset{\circ}{\underset{k}{\approx}}$ that when he does become captain/team commander, he's vetted, experienced, and clued in! "As for NCO/officer relaCITY LIGHTS



James Mashburn and a company he co-owned, Refuse Services, in early 1999 agreed to pay the fourth-largest campaign-money-laundering fine in the commission's

history, \$249,500.

Mashburn admitted that he reimbursed employees who made political contributions in cash — thus making discovery hard to trace. Through these maneuvers, he had given money to

Mayor Susan Golding, five county supervisors, and politicians in North County such as Poway's Mickey Cafagna. The fair practices committee passed on the information to the district attorney's office, but then-DA

Paul Pfingst decided not to prosecute.

Then there is the case of Gatlin Development, a real estate firm. According to the FPPC, between 1992 and 1994, the company made 107 campaign contributions

to members of and candidates for city council and the board of supervisors, along with other politicians. At the time, the contribution limit was \$250. Most of the contributions from Gatlin employees and their

spouses, along with members, relatives, and business associates of Gatlin's law firm, were for \$250. When the word of the generosity got around, chief executive Frank Gatlin received calls from other politicians asking assistance in fund-raising, according to the fair practices commission.

Frank Gatlin reimbursed his employees for the gifts. Since the practice persisted for a year and a half, the FPPC said it "indicates a pattern of laundering activity, rather than an isolated incident." Gatlin and the law firm were fined \$420,000. The FPPC referred the matter to Pfingst, who kicked it to the city attorney's office. They wouldn't touch it.

Both cases "should have been prosecuted as criminal cases," says former DA Ed Miller. "A lot of prosecutors don't want to make waves with people who have a lot of clout." But making such cases criminal would be a "significant deterrent" to campaign money laundering, says Miller.

And that's the point. For many years, there have been very few deterrents to such activities. Deputy District Attorney Rupert Linley remembers being told, when he was transferred out of the DA's environmental unit in 1997, "The DA's office wanted to be more business-friendly." That's one reason he opposed Pfingst's reelection bid. Linley says that Dumanis "wants strict enforcement."

There are multiple examples of the symbiotic relationship of politicians and businesses wanting favors. In mid-2000, the locally based Corky McMillin Companies won the contract for development of the former Naval Training Center over a larger, much better-financed, outof-town company that had been recommended by a special blue-ribbon selection committee. According to Save Our NTC Inc. McMillin got \$1 billion of assets for a few dollars, as well as tax breaks and subsidies of more than \$100 million. Records show that the McMillin firm donated heavily to local politicians.

In 1972, the city had voted a 30-foot height limit on coastal buildings. That continued on page 13

cramped McMillin's style. So the city attorney's office came up with an — er, uh — novel interpretation: The limitation did not apply to NTC because the land was in federal hands when the citizenry voted in the limitation. Shockingly, both Superior Court and the Fourth Appellate District bought into this — er, uh — bizarre argument.

The most infamous signal-sending case was the Stallings-Moores scandal. Padres majority owner John Moores showered gifts on former councilmember Valerie Stallings. He stood to gain a city-subsidized ballpark as well as one-tenth of downtown at lowball prices.

He permitted her to get on the "friends and family" list of a hot stock Moores controlled, Neon Systems, as Matt Potter first revealed in the Reader. The initial reaction of City Attorney Casey Gwinn was that the gift was not a problem because Neon didn't do business with the city. "Instead of a watchdog or an attack dog, he was a lap dog," says attorney Michael Aguirre of Gwinn. Aguirre, an excellent attack dog, is running for the post.

Eventually, the Moores gifts were investigated by federal authorities. But Stallings got a wrist slap under state law, and Moores was not charged. Because the FBI did the investigation, the records were sealed. If it had been a state investigation, they could have been opened.

The authorities never did state the value of many of the gifts bestowed on Stallings by Moores. Former councilmember Bruce Henderson asked Superior Court to make it a condition of probation that she disclose the value of those gifts. The court nixed the idea.

In announcing the dubious deal, then–U.S. Attorney Gregory Vega said that there was nothing wrong with giving money to a politician ignoring the big monetary gains Moores would make, partly through Stallings's votes. After he left office, Vega was named to the purported Ethics Commission.

Shapiro won a lawsuit charging the city council with illegally holding 12 Padres-related closed sessions. After Shapiro also won at the appellate level, the city attorney's office decreed that it would from then on take notes at closed sessions, instead of the city clerk, who had done it for years.


Viewing the foul-smelling activities through the years, Henderson sums it up: "Slime pays."

Elderly orphans

Margarita Willams, a stylishly dressed woman in her 40s, coordinates a system of "Happiness Clubs" for the elderly throughout the city. The clubs, with a collective membership of around 1600, hold dances and socials as well as seminars on such subjects as eating well, staying active, and maintaining a sense of purpose. They also advise on their rights as property owners. "I tell my old people," Williams says, "'Don't sign anything.' In fact, just today, one of the ladies that comes to the center told me that one of her daughters asked her to sign a document which used her house and a piece of property as collateral so that the daughter could open a new business. And I said, 'No, no, don't do that!' We have a saying, 'Don't give your children their inheritance while you're still alive.' '

That idea, Williams says, is somewhat contrary to Mexican custom. Traditionally, when a couple becomes too old to work, their children take care of them. "And a lot of them don't have any pension or any kind of income," she says. "They depend on their relatives; in this case, their sons and daughters who confuse them a little bit and say, 'Well, you have this property, but you are living with me. You have no income, I am feeding you, I am cleaning for you, so I need for you to give me something in return. Eventually it is going to be mine anyway, so why don't you give it to me now.' But, these days you don't know their intentions." continued on page 14

Williams adds, "It's not that everyone is trying to exploit their parents. Normally, the traditional system works out well. But my work is to protect and to advise older people, and that's why, as a standard, we advise against signing away their property." And Williams, who semi-

annually meets with her counterparts from other cities in Mexico, has found out that traditions aren't as universal along the northern border. "I've been surprised," she says, "to learn that, especially in the interior of Mexico, that the old man or woman are still the patriarchs and matriarchs. Family members still go and see them and ask for advice. They are sort of revered within the family. I feel that my old people have more problems than the ones from the interior."

Because that place of veneration in the family is less prevalent along the border, Williams says they stress physical and mental activity at their Happiness Club meeting. "Otherwise, they will stay at home and watch television all of the time, and then they will decline. So we do trips, they have a dance once a week, they have yoga, tai-chi, singing, chorus. We also offer the basics of reading and writing because a lot of them never learned. It is all to make them feel good, that being old is not necessarily a bad thing."

Sister Socorro Estrada at the Agnes Lester house describes how dealing with her residents' feelings of worthlessness, most of whom will be there until they die, is a full-time challenge. "First of all, we encourage them to pray," she says. "And we also encourage them to help out around the house. And to fight against sadness, we go to the Happiness Clubs, and we do a lot of singing and dancing around the house."

ists now." That's pretty much how it was when I was a team second-in-command. I was a senior lieutenant when I joined the team. It was very much an apprentice situation. By the time I got my own team, I was ready to command it. Not by giving orders, but simply by having a fully formed idea of what we wanted to accomplish in the time available and making it clear what that idea was.

I had great NCOs, and they did the rest. Other than that, I made sure their pay wasn't messed up, and, oh yeah, I led by example in the field.

The other major change will probably make no sense to a civilian. It is the creation of the Special Forces branch. When I was in SF, my branch was infantry. My records were held at the infantry branch, and I was considered for promotion against other infantry officers. Other SF officers came from different branches.

Under that system, staying too long in Special Forces was career suicide. An officer pretty much gave up any chance of retiring higher than lieutenant colonel. Many made that choice because they believed so much in Special Forces and its mission. And with little or no chance of promotion to higher rank, the commanders were willing to take huge chances and break a lot of rules to accomplish the mission.

I once said to Lieutenant Colonel "Pappy" Shelton that commanding the team that trained the Bolivian rangers who got Che Guevara must have done wonders for his career. He laughed and said, "If it hadn't been my last assignment before retirement, I would have never had the guts to do what I had to, to get the job done."

When the first Special Forces Group was formed in 1957, it was put on Okinawa, with an operational area that included the entire Far East. Its first commander, Colonel

"Mad Jack" Shannon, had been with OSS Detachment 101, fighting with guerrillas in Burma, in WWII. He was used to complete autonomy and had a puckish sense of humor. He once dropped six teams into South Korea, without notifying the Koreans or the U.S. Eighth Army. The result was that the South Koreans thought his teams were North Koreans and were out hunting them with live ammunition. That was what Shannon wanted. Good training.

Another time he called two senior NCOs into his office and told them to report to room 433 in the Erawan Hotel in Bangkok on Friday. The senior of the two replied, "Yes, sir. Where do we pick up our orders."

"Don't bother me with your problems," he said. "I have problems of my own."

They went to the adjutant and the group sergeant major and got the same story. Knowing they'd be in a world of hurt if they didn't get to the Erawan, they corralled a clerk, made up a phony set of orders, forged the adjutant's signature, and went to Kadena AB to catch a hop to Bangkok.

When they reported in, there was Shannon. "Just wanted to see if you still had it," he said. "Have a good time this weekend. See you on Oki Monday."

The chances of anything like that happening in today's Army are precisely nil. You may think that's a good thing. I don't.

With the creation of the Special Forces branch and USSOCOM, an SF officer now has a big pyramid he can climb. A former senior NCO, who worked on Army staffs at very high levels and is friends with generals making these decisions, puts it this way. "The reasons people didn't get promoted in the old days was that the Army didn't like Special Forces. Steiner was the first to break that mold.

"Two generals with seven stars between them told me that the reason they came out with the Special Forces and Aviation branches was because the Special Forces officers and the Aviation officers were getting a disproportionate number of promotions in the infantry, artillery, etc. Those branches demanded the Special Forces and Aviation officers go elsewhere. One of the problems I see now is that with SF as the place to be in the Army, a number of ticket-punchers will inevitably sign on."

And therein lies the danger. Ticket-punchers are concerned with their careers. Their tendency is to micromanage. With inexperienced A team commanders, that tendency is almost irresistible. To me this seems like one doctor telling another how to do a heart transplant, over the phone, while watching the operation on television.

A friend from the 101st Airborne in Vietnam has a story that illustrates perfectly what I mean. He was a line company commander but had a background in Special Forces. He had a standing order with his radio-telephone operator not to put the battalion commander on the horn if he was in contact with the enemy. He was busy.

His regular RTO, a car thief from Jersey who once killed three NVA with an entrenching tool, got an infected foot. For one operation he was replaced by a blond California surfer dude. This kid got the same instructions, but he just didn't have the guts to tell a lieutenant colonel that he couldn't speak to the captain.

My friend took the call, got rid of the colonel, and went back to work. He knew he wouldn't use the surfer again, so he didn't even chew him out.

Not so the car thief, who hunted the surfer dude up when he heard the story. "Listen," he said, "they probably don't tell you California cocksuckers this shit. But, don't never bother the man when he's killin' people."



Nothing's commoner than common knowledge, Mitch. Common as dirt. But much less useful. Tang just means tang. A catchy, easy-to-remember, good-morning-wakeup-eyeopener name for a breakfast product for the young homemaker of the atomic '50s. (Real orange juice? How...um...quaint!) General Foods sprinkled Tang on the marketplace in 1957. A few years later, when NASA was searching for items to make up its interplanetary menu, the drink mix was a natural — and with none of those annoying R&D costs. Tang didn't go into space until 1964. General Foods immediately hopped on worldwide spacemania, using the epoxy of incessant advertising to permanently fuse "Astronauts!" and "Tang!" in our tiny consumer brains. If we chose to believe Tang was developed exclusively for NASA, well, General Foods wasn't going to argue with us.

If Spam was a true first-letter-only acronym, we'd know it today as Sopah: shoulder of pork and ham. That ingredient-descriptive phrase is rumored to be the inspiration for the product name. Or it might have come from the meatwad's original name, Hormel's Spiced Ham. Whatever the case, "Spiced Ham" wasn't moving the goods off the shelf. So, the story goes, Mr. Hormel hosted a product-naming bash at his home and by the end of the evening had "Spam" a huge cleaning bill.

M.A.:

Department stores like Wal-Mart, Target, Kmart, et al., are laid out in a fashion that seems to vaguely discriminate against male shoppers by putting the "guy stuff" (automotive, hardware, sporting goods) at the rear of the store, or as far from the doors as possible, while the "chick stuff" is always at the front. Is it just me, or is this some bit of store-design psychology?

Assuming this is a "guy letter," M.E., here's a little quiz. Which would you rather do next Saturday, shop for a suit or have hernia surgery? Buy a washing machine or sit through a tax audit? Buy new underwear or rupture a tendon? Tough choices, yeah? Man was not born to shop. Woman was. Eighty percent of men's clothing sold in Target stores is bought by women. On average, 65 percent of mall traffic is women. If there is a man around, he's dawdling along behind some hard-charging female, looking either bored or panicked, since he's way out of his element. They've actually studied men's walking rates, and the only place men habitually walk more slowly than women is in a shopping mall.

It's not only that women control most of a family's purchases (except for certain bigticket items like cars), housewives in particular see being a smart shopper as an important personal quality. Men rank "smart shopper" dead last on the list of superior guy qualities. The American consumer is one of the most scrutinized creatures on the planet, and virtually every study shows that in the retail domain, women rule and men are just as happy to leave it that way. Men are hunters - goal-oriented shoppers: go in, find what you want, get out. Women are gatherers — fabric-feelers, label-readers, comparers. (That's why men's shirts in general-merchandise stores are displayed on hangers. In a men's specialty shop, they're folded around a piece of cardboard and wrapped in plastic.)

Given those universal truths, no wonder a store like Target or Wal-Mart looks like a lingerie wonderland and the tractors are back in the corner. And if 80 percent of all the shoppers looking for men's shirts are women, if they have to walk through the women's clothes section to get there, maybe they'll see a cute skirt or a purse and pick that up too.

In the layout of most large stores, there's a main path known in the biz as the racetrack that runs from the front doors down one side of the store, across the back, and down the other side, with the checkout along the front. All major product categories (including the guy stuff) and all high-visibility, end-aisle displays are connected to this corridor. When you get off this main drag onto the side streets, often you'll end up in a maze-like area that forces you to walk past lots of displays in order to get back out onto Main Street. There are lots of product-location tricks that retailers use, but hiding the Pennzoil behind the Pampers isn't one of them. Most stores are set up for consumer convenience. Too bad for you that most of those consumers happen to be women.

put down the paper and experienced one of those "I didn't know Elizabeth Taylor is still alive" moments. On this occasion, the still-alive entity referred to is the All-American Soap Box Derby.

Readers may recall seeing a flickering newsreel about a blond, tousle-haired nipper sitting in a box with wheels underneath it. The lad is steering the box-on-wheels down a steep hill alongside similar boxes that hold similar looking nippers...wait a minute. Hold it. Hold it. Huzzah! Our nipper crosses the finish line first! And, two brass bands are playing, villagers are jumping up and down and throwing their hats into the air, womenfolk are bustling around picnic tables laying out a celebration feast while, up on the stage, a big — at least ten-feet tall - silver trophy is presented to the winning nipper by Teddy Roosevelt, president of these United States.

Well, maybe it didn't happen precisely that way...maybe the president was Calvin Coolidge, but that's not the point. The point is, the All-American Soap Box Derby lives and is coming to Oceanside and San Diego!

Wow. The hell, you say.

Of course, this revelation caused a whirlwind of research on my part. Turns out, the derby, celebrating its 66th running, has all the accessories we've come to expect from our sports corporations. In fact, the All-American Soap Box Derby is blessed with the kind of commercial infrastructure of sponsors, expensive equipment, national and international competitions, websites, instruction schools, videos, magazines, books, software, customized tools, and sportswear that sits up and says to the world, "We accept Visa."

Briefly, and paraphrasing their spiel, it works like this: The All-American Soap Box Derby Championship is held every July in Derby Downs, Akron, Ohio. The field is composed of 400 qualifiers from the U.S. and foreign countries.

"The racing season runs from March through July...in over 150 cities and communities across the United States and overseas.... Each competitor builds his/her own gravity-powered car with assistance from a parent or other adult from kits purchased from the All-American Soap Box Derby."

There are, or at least seem to be, three divisions: Stock division, ages 8 to 17, competing "in simplified cars built from kits"; Super Stock division, ages 8 to 17, competing in "a larger model car made from larger kits and shells"; and, Masters division, ages 10 to 17, "entrants can build a car from scratch or purchase a Masters Kit and fiberglass body shell from the All-American Soap Box Derby.'

Derby world contains more details, ins, outs, plans, levels, rules, regulations, specs, schedules and history than any human being with a job wants to know, and I'll get to them in a minute, but, first, you probably noticed, as I did, the line about "kits purchased from the All-American Soap Box Derby." Î thought you might.

Sounds like we're dealing with a one-world government/mafia gang. Could it be that touslehaired nippers are made to buy their soap-box racers from the same criminal enterprise that puts on the — so-called — world championships? To find out, I called Derby Downs and asked a whineysounding woman, "What does a stock-division racer cost, and who takes the money?'

'I can give you exact amounts, if you need." There are more than a few governments who would imprison this woman, justly, for the way she sounds. "Yes, I think that would be a good idea." "A stock is \$312 for weight and \$80 for wheels. A red or a blue stock is \$327 plus \$80 for wheels."

"I didn't learn about what happened until I moved to the mainland when I was 18 years old. They certainly didn't teach us anything about it in school when I was a child. So, when I got here and learned what happened, I was shocked. I was so hurt that something like that had happened to American citizens. A complete disregard for their rights."

Last week I called and spoke with Reverend Norma DeSaegher, who heads Ocean View United

Church of Christ in Logan Heights. Her church has an unusual past. "In Hawaii, where I

grew up, the Japanese-American experience was very different during World War II. The only thing that really happened in Hawaii was that the Buddhist priests were rounded up and put in camps. The rest of the Japanese-American population was, by and large,

pretty much left alone. "But here at Ocean View, in the spring of 1942, all of the families were sent away. All of the Japanese in San Diego were ordered into detention." The church, orga-

nized in 1909, initially held services downtown in a building on Sixth Avenue and A Street. The church's members were not, prior to coming to the United States, Christian.

"I know my father started coming to the church in order to learn English," one of Ocean View's long-standing members told me. He also told me not to use his name. None of Ocean

View's older members, the ones who'd been shipped off to internment camps, wanted me to use their names. They made themselves very clear on that point.

Reverend DeSaegher, a second-generation Japanese-American, born and raised in Hawaii, is protective toward these people.

"In Japanese culture, there's this idea of gaman suru, of endurance. There's a strong value placed on enduring difficulty."

Which probably explains why the church has stood on Ocean View Boulevard since 1950 and weathered the neighborhood's many transitions. Even today, in the church's foyer, you can see architectural plans for the new church Reverend DeSaegher and her congregation hope to build on the same site.

Last Sunday when I visited Ocean View, the morning's theme was Memorial Day. Since Ocean View belongs to the United Church of Christ, one of the country's most liberal denominations, I'd expected the service to downplay patriotism. The morning began with the congregation singing "America the Beautiful." The Call to Worship, read aloud, stated, "In this land of freedom and beauty, let us give thanks to God! Let us praise the Holy One who has made us and the land we call the U.S.A On this Memorial Day eve, we remember the men and women who gave their lives to let freedom ring. Let us remember them with gratefulness." The congregation also sang the "Battle Hymn

of the Republic." Reverend DeSaegher's sermon, "When Will Peace Begin?" acknowledged that the "architects" of the recent war had planned for a 120-day con-

flict that ended up lasting only 20. "Although victorious, we have to consider that there might not have been any need for war at all if we'd thoroughly explored all our other options. If others, like President Jimmy Carter, had been involved in the negotiations.

Of course such ideas might not be popular if you live in a household, like I do, with a retired Army colonel. Nonetheless, I and my husband agree to disagree."

Reverend DeSaegher suggested that her household's particular harmony symbolized the blueprint

for universal lasting peace outlined in the Bible.

"Such peace is prophesized. God has promised it to us. It depends on personal decisions we make about how we treat others around us. Treating them with love. Agreeing to disagree. Reaching out to them in love and offering them help when they need it. Like our program at this church to help neighborhood kids with their homework."

Later, the 80 or so people who attended the service filled the social hall for Ocean View's elaborate weekly lunch. Eggsalad sandwiches. Several kinds of homemade sushi. Sesame chicken. A halfdozen different salads. I had a difficult time getting the church's older members to talk about their past.

"For those of us who were kids at the time, it wasn't so bad," one of them told me. "What do kids know? They just want to play." "Most of the fami-

lies here in San Diego were

sent to the camp in Poston, Arizona," another told me. "We of course held church services there. But, after the war, after we were released, the community scattered. People moved all over. There were about 400 people in this church before the war. Maybe only 200 returned."

I asked one older gentleman if he'd ever discussed his experience in the camp with his own children. He said no.

"I don't know that they would have been interested. You know, it was just some big story of their father's. I don't know. I think the idea was to put the past behind us. Move on. In Japanese they say, 'shikata ga nai.' It couldn't be helped. What's done is done.

He thought for a while.

"I remember after we were released and came back to San Diego, I met some of my playmates. Kids I'd known at school. They greeted me as if nothing had happened. As if I'd been away on vacation.'

My seven siblings all still live in Upstate New York near where we were raised. I try to maintain contact with as many as logistically possible, but the last time I visited my brother, this boy's father, was five years ago. This happened at the ancestral home, when our parents were still in residence. His wife stayed home with the children, so they "would not be contaminated by my lifestyle." My brother and I have remained in cordial e-mail contact since. His wife sent me a family-portrait greeting card this past holiday season, in response to my holiday card to them. My sisters keep me posted about my brother's fortunes. He recently suffered a layoff and long quest for employment. After six months of searching, he found work in Phoenix. He'd be alone there till his family joined him when the school term ended. I wrote him to invite him to vacation in San Diego, alone or en masse, at my expense. No response. My nephew's letter is a solicitation to contribute money and prayers to his evangelical mission trip to Panama. It's a computer-generated form letter with the salutation "Dear Uncle," and a handwritten signature. I have just returned from a long, introspective walk. My blood pressure has returned to a semi-normal level. The only socially acceptable course of action I can think of is to plead for guidance. All the stereotypical relationships between evangelical Christians and homosexuals are on my mind, but my biggest thought is, "Forgive him, Father, for he knows not what he has done." How should I answer the teenager's letter?


A SAD "FUNNY" LA MESA UNCLE

Dear Uncle,

You write like a man with a wry sense of humor. I think you have several viable choices here. If you are (justifiably, I think) depressed to get this request to help fund religious missions sponsored by a church whose beliefs and policies treat homosexuals as diseased, you could write your nephew and explain this in as kind and witty a way as you can. Wish him well on his Panamanian adventure, and let him know you're interested in his "doings," but that you can't in good conscience give money to causes that do not respect homosexuals and that actively undermine their rights and dignity. Just as he has his cherished shared beliefs, you have yours. (These are my awkward words. Use your own more articulate expressions.) I wouldn't want to take any bets on whether this will anger his parents, fall on deaf ears, or unleash a torrent of proselytizing. But if he solicits you in this way, you have a right to respond if you are so moved. Or you can simply ignore his request. Silence can be an eloquent response. Or you could write a letter to your brother and explain how you feel; enclosing a note for your nephew, which he can pass along to his son if he thinks it's appropriate. And by all means, quote from the good book in framing your response if you've a mind to.

My friend Gracie has been dry for two years now. She's only 29, but she's had a problem with alcohol ever since her late teens - she always knew where to find her mother's hidden bottles of gin. By the time she turned 21, she was out of control. Thankfully, she seems to be waging a successful campaign against that demon, and is living a clean and sober life. For her 30th, we wanted

to celebrate that life a big bash with music. lavish food, and all her friends. But what to drink? Normally, my parties are dripping wet — wine, beer, booze, the gamut. Gracie comes and doesn't mind. But this was her party; I didn't want her to be the odd gal out.

I was grabbing a cappuccino at Caffe Italia when it hit me: Italian sodas, the kind you make with flavored syrup and soda water. Sophisticated and fun, and it even kept some of that mixeddrink ritual flair. I'd seen those red-, yellow-, and blue-labeled bottles behind the bar at

many a coffee shop, but I'd never spotted them in the grocery store. So I started my search at Smart & Final, which I knew supplied restaurants. The store carried 17 flavors from Torani, the most popular Italian-style syrup, and the one I'd seen in Caffe Italia. Most, like the Caramel and Butterscotch, seemed geared toward coffee; I was after fruit. I grabbed a bottle of raspberry (\$3.99 for 750 ml), then snatched another of vanilla, remembering my husband Patrick's fondness for vanilla ice cream sodas with coffee ice cream. For comparison, I snagged a raspberry and vanilla from the less familiar La Romanella brand (\$3.65 for 750 ml). Then I headed over to Mona Lisa in Little Italy.

There, I found a scant five flavors of Torani: vanilla, cacao, hazelnut, almond, and strawberry (\$5.99 for 750 ml). Frustrated, I headed back to where my quest began: Caffe Italia. They sent me to Café Moto (1-800-818-3363) on J Street, telling me that it was a wholesale supplier to coffee shops that also ran a retail outlet. As soon as I walked in, I knew I had hit pay dirt. Shelves and shelves of bottles glistened in the sunlight that poured through the windows. They carried Torani, but also Monin, a French

brand. I found 12 fruit flavors from Torani and 15 from Monin.

"The Monin is more true to flavor," advised the clerk. 'You can use less of it in a drink. Generally, you use one or two ounces in a glass and then fill the rest with ice and sparkling water."

Both brands offered sugar-free ver-

sions of some flavors, which the clerk said were 'made with Splenda. It's made from real sugar, but it's processed in a way that doesn't allow your body to register the calories. But sugarfree stuff always tastes different than the real stuff," she cautioned. I picked several from each brand (though the clerk's advice made me lean toward the Monin) and a couple of sugar-frees for the dieters at my party. Monin rang in at \$5.37 for 750 ml or \$2.29 for 250 ml. Torani cost \$4.15 for 750 ml and \$1.63 for 187 ml. I was tempted by the soda siphon from ISI (\$39.89), Sophisticated and fun, and it even kept some of that

mixed-drink ritual flair.

which would allow me to make soda water from still water via a carbon dioxide cartridge (\$4.19 for 10). But I decided to see if homemade soda could capture my heart before the siphon captured my \$40.

That night, my kids hovered jealously outside the kitchen while Patrick, friend Bernice, and I gathered around the table for some soda tastetesting. (They would get theirs tomorrow - if they were good.) I had searched the Monin web-

site (www.monin.com) and found, amid the many specialty-drink recipes, the proportions for basic handmade soda. Eight ounces of club soda or mineral water, 3/4 ounce syrup, and ice. (We thought club soda did a better job of letting the fruit flavor shine through.)

First, we lined up the raspberry candidates: Torani, La Romanella, Monin, and Monin sugar-free. La Romanella bombed out earlyno discernible raspberry flavor. Torani had plenty of acid, but again, no raspberry flavor. I upped the syrup to two ounces, and it helped, but Bernice griped, "When you add enough syrup to taste the raspberry, it becomes sickeningly sweet." Her grimace turned to a smile when we sipped the Monin, however. "Natural rasp-

> berry - fresh, rich, and crisp. Í also like the way these sodas don't leave me gassy or burpy. I always have to belch when I drink Coke or Sprite." While we could still taste the raspberry in the Monin sugar-free, the diet aftertaste overpowered everything else.

Torani biffed again with its strawberry syrup -

light strawberry, heavy chemical component. While the Monin included no preservatives, we read of sodium benzonate and potassium sorbate in the Toraniperhaps they were to blame. Torani sugar-free strawberry also suffered from diet-flavor syndrome.

Patrick clamored for vanilla, and here, the Torani came through: real, balanced roasted vanilla flavor. As opposed to La Romanella, which ratcheted up the roasted component to burnt and ruined the whole.

Only one Torani remained before we had a clear field of Monin: Pear. "It smells like pear cider," commented Patrick, "but it looks like water that kids have left backwash in." "Or cloudy lemonade," offered Bernice, seeking a more appetizing comparison. Either way, it smelled better than it looked - or tasted. Monin, on the other hand, solidified its lead. "It leaves me 'Monin' with pleasure," grinned Patrick. "It's so rich," said Bernice — the soda, not his joke.

Monin's Granny Smith Apple intrigued us with its chartreuse color. "It smells like an apple Jolly Rancher," noted Bernice, "but it's sharp on the tongue, like a Granny Smith apple. Still the apple taste is a little light. It's not bad, just not as delectable as the other Monins.' Happily, passion fruit's smell and taste had everyone repeating, "Yummy," even Patrick, who normally avoids frilly-sounding fruit. Monin was the winner, hands down. Every one of its flavors - which are made from fruit concentrates instead of extracts — was better than the other brands' versions. I think Gracie will be pleased.

HEAR THAT WHISTLE

"The whistleblower is part of the system, and we're pleased that it worked," North Island's Captain Peter Laszcz told one of the several TV news reporters to show up at the base as a result of a news release touting Shott's award from the Washington-based U.S. Office of Independent Counsel. "Once we became aware of that,we took immediate steps to stop all work, inspect the work we had done, and fix the work once we found out it wasn't up to standards." Shott had long labored on the catapult hydraulic piping systems, which are used to fling the nation's multimillion-dollar jet fighters and their crews from the carrier decks into battle, as well as the jet-blast deflector doors that are raised and lowered during takeoff operations. The only woman in a shop called the Voyage Repair Team, Shott's repeated complaints to civilian supervisors and their naval officer superiors went nowhere, until they finally caught the attention of special counsel Elaine D. Kaplan, a lawyer who took that job in May 1998 after being nominated to a five-year term by President Bill Clinton.

About the same time she signed off on the award for Shott, Kaplan also went to bat for Bogdan Dzakovic, an ex–special agent with the Federal Aviation

Administration's "Red Team," a crew of undercover security agents who were supposed to penetrate airport security and find shortcomings. Dzakovic alleged the program was grossly mismanaged and was rewarded by being hastily shuffled to an obscure agency job by Admiral James Loy, then undersecretary of transportation security.

Reportedly, neither the Shott award nor the Dzakovic investigation made Democrat Kaplan popular with the Navy and elsewhere in the Bush administration and the Republican Congress. Though the Shott story got virtually no play in the *San Diego Union-Tribune*, it did garner local TV coverage and made big headlines in the *Daily Press of Newport News*, along with other papers in cities where bases and Navy repair facilities are located.

That appears to be just what Kaplan intended. She set up the Public Servant Award program in 2001, raising the profile of the Office of Special Counsel, which had until then concentrated on enforcing the Hatch Act, the ban against federal employees involving themselves in political activities. Shott was the whistleblowing honor's fourth recipient, and what she alleged didn't make the Navy look good. A subsequent Navy investigation sustained many of her claims.

"On the USS *Abraham Lincoln*, [investigators] found that only 2 out of approximately 100 welds passed their inspection; on the USS *Nimitz*, only one weld out of approximately 100 passed," noted KaCrewmembers aboard USS Abraham Lincoln (left); Kristin Shott at work (above)

plan's release heralding Shott's award. "The team also found the Voyage Repair Team welders had performed nonconforming welds on the USS *Constellation* and USS *John C. Stennis*' catapult hydraulic systems and on the USS *Carl Vinson*'s jet blast deflector cylinder vent piping. The agency report explains that most of the nonconforming welds failed inspection because they were undersized.

"The agency report concluded that four supervisors and one Naval Officer had performed their duties in a negligent manner. It found that the North Island Voyage Repair Team first-line supervisor was aware that the Voyage Repair Team employees were not properly certified, yet he failed to aggressively

The toaster sits on a slab of Ivory Fantasy granand we had decided to buy some sterling-silver flatware, since we didn't seem to get given any. We had not bought a single piece yet. I showed my friends, and then for our 25th, when the presents began to roll in, they

ite, a compromise stone that incorporates the black and white and mica flecks that Joyce admires with the "pinky Italian" veins that please Linda. The granite counters sit atop warm cherry cabinets, which in turn stand on cool, swirled squares of pale-gray travertine. More cherry cabinets cover the kitchen walls, except for the square granite backsplash behind the stainless steel Viking range and the occasional swath of gray-green wallpaper adorned with watercolor-style images of what might be flowering dogwood.

> "It's been about eight or nine months since we had the kitchen remodeled," says Joyce, "so we still don't know where anything is." Linda explains that boxes and boxes "ancient cookie sheets, every pot and pan you've ever owned" — were donated to Battered Women's Services. The donation may have included one box too many; the blender is still missing, along with the salad bowl and a couple of pans that belonged to Linda's late mother. And somewhere along the way, the old toaster faded into history.

> "When we first moved in together," some 30 years ago, recalls Linda, "Joyce's mother Vic bought us a toaster. It was a cheap toaster — it was stainless steel — but it came wrapped in wedding paper. This was

sort of a bankshot wedding gift. She wasn't taking respon-

sibility for the idea that it was a wedding gift, but it kind of was, you know? So it meant a lot to us that she had done this. We held on to that toaster for a million years; we were keeping it for old times' sake." Today, a hand-colored portrait of Vic in full Mardi Gras regalia hangs in the dining room.

The old toaster was iconic, a quiet affirmation in a time when lesbian couples caused more uproar than today. Today, people have commitment ceremonies. Today, there would be presents, presents of the sort that regularly appear in heterosexual wedding registries. Things like toasters and flatware.

Joyce and Linda's flat-



a squared-off, Deco-type handle. Linda tells the story. "My best friend's Uncle Aurel is 88 years old and quite the flamer. Every couple of years he lives in Macon, Georgia — 'Well, Ahm goin' to New Yawk for the opera season. Are y'all comin' or not?' So we say, 'All right, Aurel; we'll be there.' We do this sort of grand promenade around the Big Apple with Aurel. He'll decide where we're going to lunch each day, and we'll do that. One day, we were in Tiffany's, and I said, 'Oh, let me show you the pattern that we decided to get.' Our 25th anniversary was coming around, were all pieces of this silver."

Linda made the trip to New York without Joyce, who "doesn't do crowds." It's easy to believe; sound and motion seem much more a part of Linda's persona than Joyce's. "Linda took the initiative in the kitchen remodel," says Joyce. "I tend to live with things longer. But when the stove started falling apart, that was the last straw. We had a double-wall oven, and it wasn't holding up. It got so you couldn't cook a meal in it, and I thought, 'Well, that's got to go, so we may as well do the rest of it.'

"We both come from working-class families," adds Linda. "The idea of getting a new thing just because you want it was not part of the training."

Besides sharing an economic background, Linda and Joyce shared a hometown in western Massachusetts. Says Linda, "My first memory of Joyce is that she was working in her grandmother's store, and I saw her in there. It was the first place I was allowed to go by myself away from the

house." Joyce began working there when she was eight years old. She and Linda were neighbors, separated by eight years and half a block.

Eight years is an enormous distance between children, but gradually, the distance lessened. "There was a period of time when Joyce was a teacher at the high school, when she was 21 and I was 13," says Linda. "Other teachers would give you a book to make you go away, but Joyce would give me a book and talk to me about what I read in it. Or she would give me a book and then give me another book and say, 'How does this guy's sense of this differ from the other guy's sense?" Joyce taught English, but she gave her eager pupil "philosophy, too. She had me reading Teilhard de



Chardin," a contemporary Catholic philosopher. "I thought Joyce was completely wonderful and completely smart. I pretty much followed her around and cleaned her blackboards and had a big old crush."

The school was Catholic, as were the young women. The time was the early '60s. Linda's "crush" was simply fascination."I was fantastically interested in Joyce, but I didn't understand that to be sexual. Number one, at that time, you were not expected to be a sexual being in high school. Number two, I had been raised Catholic and had been given to understand that it would not be good if I had any sexual feelings. I could tell that I wasn't as interested in boys as the other girls, but there was part of me that thought that just meant that I was a better Catholic - more pure."

Joyce left the high school after two years and began teaching college in Boston. Linda went to Cornell for her undergraduate studies. Linda paid an occasional visit to her old teacher, "and we would have wonderful con-

versations. I looked up to her. She was a scholar; I wanted to be a scholar."

The gap brought on by their difference in age really began to close during the early '70s. Joyce was in her early 30s, studying for her doctorate in religious and philosophical thought from Boston University. Linda was pursuing a master's in ethics from Harvard Divinity School. "We had almost three years like that, and in that time, I began to feel more like Joyce's peer. I think we really became friends on an equal level." At the end of those three years, they became lovers. Linda had had a relationship with a woman she met at Cornell, and it was Linda who proved the catalyst for Joyce's realization that she herself was a lesbian.

Early-'70s Boston was a heady place to be if you were a feminist theologian and philosopher; perhaps even more so if you were a lesbian. "The personal is political," ran the slogan, and to it, Linda added the phrase"is spiritual." Boston College professor Mary Daly, author of the revolution-

arv book The Church and the Second Sex, had become a big enough deal to merit an invitation to speak from the pulpit at Harvard's Memorial Chapel. Linda who had entered the Divinity School in the hope that by the time she graduated, the Catholic Church would be ordaining women priests --- was one of Daly's fans.

"Mary Daly decided she was going to describe how women had been treated by Christianity and invite women, for their own spiritual well-being, to leave the church. We figured that four or five of us would actually do it, so we positioned ourselves in different places in the church so that it would look like somebody left. She had chosen these great scripture readings. At one point, my friend Emily got up and read from Paul, 'Women shall keep silent in the churches.' I mean, it was fun. We read all the anti-women stuff in the Bible. Then Mary gets up there and says, 'Well, this is how women have been treated. I'm the first woman they've ever let talk up here, so I'm saying, "Let's get the hell out of here!" 'We started down the aisle, and we couldn't get out - the women couldn't leave fast enough. Every woman in that place left, and I would say that 20 percent of the men left, too.

"We spent the day together. You wouldn't just say, 'Oh, that was cool; let's go home.' It was very energizing. That was the beginning of a community that met together to talk about abortion, to talk about birth control. Can you believe it? Birth control was illegal. In some ways, I felt like I could see a little bit of how the early Christians must have felt. There was a whole new thing under the sun in terms of spiritual reality, and you had an opportunity to commit yourself to it and let go of the old stuff that had been weighing you down." Several Boston colleges and universities were in a consortium with Boston College, where Daly taught, "and women everywhere started taking her courses. It got to be very, very thrilling and exciting.'

At the same time, says

Linda, "culturally, there started to be lesbian music. There started to be lesbian comedy. There started to be lesbian music and comedy festivals. I helped produce the first Boston Women's Music Festival, and I had never been in the same room with so many lesbians in my whole life. We filled Sanders Theater, which is 800 people."

"There were no role models," comments Jovce. "We didn't know much about it until it started coming out everywhere. Once it got started, then there was a lot of reinforcement."

There was also fear. Linda remembers "standing at the door and collecting tickets and having the woman who had been the supervisor of my field work walk in. I said, 'Oh! Dr. White!' and she said, 'Hello, Linda,' and I said, 'Hello, Dr. White,' and she kept going. I turned to my friend and said, 'Oh, my God, that's my field-work supervisor!' My friend said, 'Linda she's here, too,' and I thought, 'Oh, this is good.' Not that Dr. White ever spoke to me again. She was afraid I was going to out her. I didn't know anything about her she could have had kids. She could have lost her job; she could have lost her kids. There are still places where you can lose a tenured faculty position because it's considered moral turpitude."

And, says Linda, you can always lose your family, regardless of the law. "If you're going to come out, it's either going to work or it's not, and you don't know until you do it. The best answer I ever heard to a coming out was given by Joyce's sister Beverly. When Joyce came out to her in 1973, she said, and I quote, 'Oh, thank God! I thought you were alone!' But other people say, 'Get out of my house and don't ever come here again."

Whatever the law and whatever the family reaction, Linda and Joyce pressed on together. They date their anniversary from a conversation held on New Year's Eve, 1972 — "Trust two philosophy majors to have their anniversary be a conversation," jokes Linda — in which "It became clear to us that we were both in this for the

long haul. I didn't think until then that Joyce was as serious about it as I was. The fact is that I had been kind of ass-over-teakettle in love with her for ten years, so it took me a while to figure out that this was serious for her as well."

A year and a half later, around the time that they moved in together,"We went out in the woods by ourselves and said some stuff to each other about how we felt about each other, what we promised in terms of working at it and staying with it. We gave each other really cheap silver necklaces, because it was what we could afford. I don't even know if we told our friends; that was too marriage-like. In those days, nobody was doing anything like that." But they did get that toaster.

Dinner tonight is spaghetti with shrimp and basil. Linda has been watching the cooking show *Molto Mario* on television. "What he says is, 'No Italian goes to the store and says, "I'm going to make veal Parmesan today." What they do is go to the store to see what's good.' I had an idea that I wanted to do some kind of seafood and some kind of herb. Sometimes there are really nice scallops at Albertson's, but then it turned out that the shrimp looked good and the basil looked good, so that's what we did."

After setting out Chardonnay and Brie and crackers, Linda sets the water on to boil; the flame from the Viking range makes a royal blue crown around the base of the pot. She minces basil and garlic, then drizzles a pool of olive oil into a heavyweight frypan and starts them cooking with some pepper and a little bit of nutmeg. In go the shrimp; the oil pops, sputters, and roils. After a minute or so, she kills the heat. "I started it on high, then turned it off because I thought it was getting too cooked." When the spaghetti nears completion, she starts the flame again; almost immediately the sputtering resumes. After another minute, she waves her hand over the pan, wafting the rising steam toward her face. "I judge the basil by the smell."

Linda judges pasta by

the feel of it between her teeth. When it is finished, she drains the pot. She is careful to first add a couple ladlefuls of pasta water to the shrimp — the starch will thicken the sauce. The pasta goes into the pan with the shrimp, and the lot is tossed about with additional uncooked basil. "More *Molto Mario* stuff." The whole thing takes maybe ten minutes. "The shrimp were already de-veined," she notes.

Joyce, meanwhile, has been making a salad and dressing it with "garlic, olive oil, balsamic vinegar, parsley, salt, pepper, water, and just a touch of maple syrup." She has also sliced up a seedy baguette she picked up at Vons. Joyce cooks more often - she usually arrives home earlier than Linda does — but Linda enjoys it more, especially since the remodel. Also, says Linda, Joyce bakes. "I'm a pretty good cook, but I can't bake to save my life. We had an ice cream business a million years ago, and Joyce's mother got sick in the middle of it. I must have made the cookies and the biscuits for the shortcake every day for a week while she was gone, and I never made one thing that was edible."

That may be an exaggeration; the part about "a million years ago" certainly is. The Amazon Sweet Shop opened in the shopping center at 63rd and El Cajon Boulevard in 1978. Linda and Joyce had arrived in San Diego three years earlier.

Around the same time that she and Linda had their anniversary conversation, Joyce headed off to teach at the University of Notre Dame. "Our first year together, we were apart," quips Linda. But once she was ensconced in the Midwestern Catholic stronghold, she had became bored and a little frustrated. Linda recalls that "Joyce wrote me and said, 'It's so boring here, the special at the deli is baloney on white."

The university tried to liven things up with a steady stream of visiting speakers, concerts, and the like, but Joyce was still less than happy, "because it was this whole Catholic atmosphere." She had already broken with the Catholic Church on theological grounds, arguing in her doctoral dissertation that the notion that mankind is in need of saving "as a foundation for any valuable belief undermines human nature. If you need saving, you've gone bad, and I don't believe that for one second. I believe that if anything, we're born neutral and that people are defined by their actions."

"They were openminded people at Notre Dame, which was nice you didn't have to teach dogma. They were really very good intellectuals, but they weren't so open-minded that they would go along with the stuff that I was going into, not just in the classroom but outside it. We'd get students together and get women together about the feminist things of the time. They weren't all too thrilled about that." Two years later, she and Linda set out for San Diego after having packed everything they could carry in a Plymouth Volaré.

They came because Linda "hated to be cold. When I was eight years old, I was watching something on television, and it was winter and there were people on the television who were outside. I said to my father, 'Where is that?' He said, 'California.' I said, 'Someday, I'm going to live there.' That was kind of my plan throughout." Los Angeles proved unappealing, and "I didn't know how far north it stayed warm, so we just went south. We really came here for the weather. People in Boston thought that was just nuts."

"Especially 25 years ago," says Joyce. "It was like a time warp."

On their drive, the two had stopped in Texas, "to see this fellow who used to make ice cream in Boston. We were thinking about doing an ice cream shop." But once they got here, "People were more interested in natural foods. And we had read the book Sugar Blues, which really turned us around. We decided to make ice cream with honey and not put any chemicals or dyes in it. Everything in the Amazon Sweet Shop was sweetened with honey or maple syrup. We had lots of customers, and we did a good wholesale business.



In those days, there were a lot more natural restaurants around. We used to make green tea ice cream for Prophet. Kung Food used to have us in their little deli. People's in Ocean Beach..."

....Windmill Farms, which became Henry's," continues Linda. "Frasier Farms, which is what Greentree grocers is."

"But there was very little profit margin," resumes Joyce. "We used high-quality ingredients, and people weren't used to paying a high price for ice cream ---not like today. It was a struggle."

Still, says Linda, "we did a lot of political work out of the ice cream store, not the least of which was just being out lesbians in the middle of a suburban shopping center. There was no Hillcrest, or we would have been there. We thought that being near the college would be good." But, she says, college students were generally too impoverished for gourmet ice cream and too

politically staid to deal with lesbians.

The rest of the community was somewhat more receptive. For example, says Linda, "There was an initiative on the California ballot that would have kept teachers from bringing up the word 'gay' or 'lesbian' or saying that they thought this was a reasonable lifestyle or anything in a California school. We thought this was idiotic, since the numberone issue in teenage suicide is sexual orientation or perceived sexual orientation or fear that their parents are going to find out about their sexual orientation. If you have any seriousness about dealing with teenage suicide, which is the numberone cause of death in teenagers, you have to deal with this issue, and you can't deal with it if you can't talk about it."

The two women collected money and sold buttons, "But more than anything, we just talked to people. People would come in and say, 'I'll have a cone of vanilla,' then ask, 'What does this initiative mean? What's your take on this?'We were the gay and lesbian people that people knew. We were there, and not only were we there, but they knew we were people of good will. Not only did we not molest their children; we would go running out of the shop to keep their children from stepping out into traffic. We had a lot of opportunity to do political work that way."

Despite their East County location, the lesbian-feminist-theologianphilosopher-ice-cream-makers began to attract a following. "On Friday nights," says Joyce, "people would come in to talk to each other. That would be one of our busiest nights." Mary Daly visited and gave an impromptu Friday-night lecture. Lesbian poets would stop by and give readings. Politics was in the air, and even San Diego was "loosening up." (Or at least some of it was. "Our store was four doors down from the yarn store," recalls Linda. "At no time would that woman ever look at us or respond to our saying, 'Good morning.' I developed the habit of running into her in other stores in the shopping center and greeting her warmly, as if we were best friends, so that she would be mortified.")

And because they ran a natural-foods sweet shop, their "being there" political work extended into some surprising niches. Linda says, "One of our best customers was a Mormon woman and her children. She had these little girl twins, and when they were about five, one of them came up to me and said, 'Who's the boss here?' Joyce had come up in the front, and I said, 'We're both the boss. Joyce is the boss and I'm the boss.' She said, 'No — who's the manager?' I said, 'We're both the manager. Joyce is the manager and I'm the manager.' She thought and thought and thought -


clearly we were not understanding the question. Finally, what she said was, 'Who's the boy boss?' She had really learned the hierarchy where a woman could not be at the top."

Later, the girl came back and told them, " 'When I grow up, I want to be roommates, just like you.' She had been told the name of what we were was 'roommates,' which I think is a perfectly good explanation for a sixyear-old."

One of Joyce's favorite stories involves a young boy. "We had these names painted on the walls all around the store. They were names of women we knew or women in history that we respected. This little boy was reading and reading, and he said, 'How come you don't have any boys' names up there?' I mean, there's privilege right there. He assumed a male name should be up there. All these things are named after men, and you don't find little girls saying, 'Where are the girls'

names on that?' It's not expected."

The two sold the business in 1984; since then, Linda has gone on to become a chiropractor. Joyce now serves as executive director of the Greater San Diego Business Association — the gay and lesbian chamber of commerce. Now they gather with friends around cultural happenings; they dine out; they attend social events. Then, the sweet shop was home; a living room where they played host to a community. Now, home is home. Friends and family come over occasionally, but they are more likely to spend a free evening alone in each other's company. Sometimes they watch sports ----Linda has attended Wimbledon and two Olympics ----or taped episodes of The West Wing, The Waltons, Little House on the Prairie, or Joyce's secret passion, Kung Fu: The Legend Continues. As "sincere pacifists," they generally avoid the various species of violence that ani-

Dinner is served in the dining room — dark-wood floors, white walls, fourinch plantation shutters over one window. The other window looks out on the viewdown the notch formed by two shadowy hills and into the twinkling valley beyond — Mission Valley. Linda and Joyce live high on a hill in eastern La Mesa; from their days of renting in Lemon Grove and the College Area to their first house purchase in Spring Valley to here, they have never strayed from East County. "We're both country girls," admits Linda. "In our hometown, there were woods and rolling hills. Now, we could buy downtown if we wanted to, but I don't want to live in the city. I don't like how it smells. I like to come home and smell the dirt and the nightblooming jasmine. I can go sit out in my hot tub at night, and I could be anywhere."

The one element of the dining room that seems out of place is the dining set itself, all oak and unadorned straight lines with rounded corners.

"We just haven't replaced it yet," Joyce assures me.

"It's from the cheap, old furniture," adds Linda. "A new dining set will happen; it's just happening a little at a time."

"We should probably just give it away; then I would be forced to go and choose my set."

"See, now, there's an example of where you get

to pick. I got to pick our bedroom set, so she gets to pick the dining room."

"I just hope I never do." "So do I, Honey." "I really will, as soon as we get a new couch."

The couch was more Linda's decision, and Linda grants that she gets to choose a lot. But Joyce did score a victory with her cinnamon leather chair and ottoman in the living room off the kitchen. "I didn't want it in there," says Linda, "but we got it. I thought it didn't go with the rest of the room, so we painted the walls to make it go more." Now the chair sits on a teal carpet; the surrounding walls are butter yellow.

Dinner is over; Joyce begins doing the dishes. Linda says there is no butchfemme division of duties. "Joyce mows the lawn because I'm allergic. I just made the valence for the curtains, and I made the curtains as well."

"Once in a while I iron something for Linda, but it's because I've lost a bet." After 30 years, the domestic order is well established. There is harmony, though the pair have at times welcomed outside assistance, attending what Linda calls "four different blobs of therapy" at various stages. When they bought their first house together, for instance, they found themselves refighting old fights. The therapist pointed out that home ownership was for them a new level of intimacy, and the pressure involved in reaching that level was causing the relationship to "shift along the fault lines." They got through it partly by learning to counter their natural tendencies — Linda's to yell, Joyce's to withdraw.

And after 30 years, there is increasing harmony with those who object to their way of life — the edges are wearing down."I had a conversation on the phone today with my cousin Rita," relates Linda. "These are cousins that I have absolutely nothing in common with. However, when my mother was old and ill, they helped a lot in taking care of her. So I'm grateful to these people, and I'm going to relate to them until they die; that's just how it is. But they are, like, the rightest-wing Catholics you will ever find and fullon right-wing Republicans — and that's not what we are at all."

"But you know, they are accepting of us. Partially because over the years they got over it, but also because Rita has a niece who is a lesbian, and that woman is a saint. She takes battered children into her home and loves them into sanity. The Pope would think this was a good person. So they're kind of getting over it."

"Today, I was on the phone with Rita and she said, 'Oh, have you heard about those terrible gay men that dress up as nuns and show their breasts?' She was talking about the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence they're these gay men up in San Francisco who do nun drag."

"I didn't know they

showed their breasts," marvels Joyce.

"I don't know, that's what she said. I didn't happen to see it. It's probably Rita's fantasy. But anyway, she says, 'They're giving gays a bad name.' I thought, 'I have lived a long time, that it takes the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence to give the gays a bad name to a right-wing Republican Catholic.' And at the end of the conversation, Bill, who is her husband and who is actually my cousin and who has taken a little longer to come around to this, said to me, 'Um, give my love to Joyce.' I said, 'Thank you, Bill: I will."

"They've always been very nice to me," reflects Joyce.

"Well, they would be nice to you. I think it's because they think it's a sin to be rude."

"A lot of people who are Christians don't think that."

"I know, but they do. These folks walk the walk; they don't just talk the talk. I mean, they stop at four o'clock every day and say the Rosary. They are fullon Catholics."

Linda and Joyce stayed with the Church long after they stopped being "full-on Catholics," out of the mentality, explains Joyce, "that the hierarchy was one way and the people were another way, and the tenets of the Church, generally speaking, were good principles to live by." But by her early 30s, Joyce decided she could no longer remain in "an





oppressive, hierarchical institution that keeps women down and judges gays and lesbians."

Linda had already left. "I can't be part of a Church that thinks I'm depraved," she says."I consider my relationship with Joyce to be the holiest thing in my life, and I won't participate in a religion that thinks the holiest thing in my life is a sin. It's not that I didn't grieve; I grieved and grieved. The Church crippled me in a number of ways, but I loved the Church, and the Church gave me a lot of things." The Church provided a model of unchanging consistency. There were books and art in the Church. Further, "When they try to point you toward a reality that's deeper and bigger than what you can see in front of your face, they open your mind up to a whole realm that if you're just running around playing hopscotch, you won't have an opportunity to see."

Today, says Linda, "I believe in a power greater than myself, but I don't go and hang around with other people about that. I notice the solstices; winter solstice is when we exchange gifts with our lesbian friends instead of Christmas. But the truth is, when I go to pagan stuff, it reminds me too much of high Mass, and then I get weirded out. I go out in my hot tub at night, usually by myself, and do what I do about spirituality in that context."

As for Joyce, she says, "I have a spiritual life; it's not communal. When I taught theology, I taught the difference between capital-*R* religion and small-*r* religion. Capital-*R* religion is organized religion, while small-*r* religion is sort of everyday religion, what you hold to be meaningful, valuable, truthful, and beautiful in your life. I evaluate my life that way."

The Christian notion that Jesus saves is offensive to Joyce because she doesn't think people need saving, while Linda doesn't believe that "women are saved by taking a male human — Jesus may have been other things, but we certainly agree that he was a male human. I don't think that's an image that's going to save women. I think that might be an image that would be very good for men, but I think women need some kind of a female image of goodness and holiness. I think Jesus was a swell guy, and I think there are other swell guys. Having lived in patriarchy my whole life, I need to look at female images who are transcendent."

Such as? "I have to tell you, I think the closest thing that I've seen to a female image of transcendence is Bette Midler — the Divine Miss M. The divine part is not a joke. I mean, I think at the very least, she's a shaman. Sometimes, when I'm at her concerts, I find myself doing this"-reaching out with one hand, as if to touch someone."I've seen evangelical Christians do that, and I used to think, 'What the hell are they doing?' Then I saw myself doing it. I mean, I was reaching out to touch something in her that was..."

The sheet music for Midler's hit song "Wind Beneath My Wings" rests on a wrought-iron music stand beneath Vic's portrait in the dining room. An oil painting of a young Bette, wearing a low-cut dress and looking transported, hangs above the television. In the hallway, there is a poster advertising an early-'70s Midler concert in Boston. "The Divine Miss M, Bette Midler, Atlantic Recording Artist." "That was her first album, so she was singing things like 'Boogie-Woogie Bugle Boy of Company B.' Barry Manilow was the piano player. I was really nervous the first time I was going to take Joyce to a Bette Midler concert, because if she didn't get it or she didn't like it, there was no way... But she loved it."

But the painting, the music, and the poster don't reveal what it is that makes her a shaman. "You have to experience her. In a live performance, she sings and she tells jokes. She's actually quite bawdy, but there's a way in which she talks about sex that's not dirty. She's very sex positive in a way that does not demean women or her or men. She shows forth. Do you know the theological concept of transcendence versus immanence? Transcendent is the realm off there somewhere. and immanent is what Jesus Christ was in Christianity. I see a kind of immanence. When I look at her doing that art, I can see the divine that is immanent in her in that moment. There's a way in which, when you see Mother Teresa hold a child, you see, I think..."

"It's when somebody is who they are," suggests Joyce.

"As hard as they can be," agrees Linda. "That's what it is about Bette. She's about being the best goddamn Bette Midler that ever came down the pike. She does herself with her whole heart. That's what I believe in; that's what I try to do. Bette's a lot better at it than I am, but I aspire."

Somebody's being who she is sounds akin to integrity, and 30 years after those heady days at Harvard, it's easy to see why such a thing would be admired. As Linda says, "Sometimes, you have a nice house and you drive a nice car and you only work four days a week, and you start wondering whether you've lost your politics. I had an interesting experience about a year ago. My friend Emily and I wrote a number of papers and articles in that time, and Emily is now director of women's studies at the University of Redlands. She will sometimes assign her class something that we wrote a million years ago and then have me come up and be the guest speaker.

"What I find that I really love is that I still believe all that stuff. I feel I still live by that. I think the basic thing is a kind of integrity with myself and integrity with the world that requires I try to do something. What's that line from the Old Testament about 'What does the Lord thy God require of thee?' Something like, love justice and walk humbly with your God. I think loving justice means you have to make an internal commitment to make the world a more just place. That used to be in the form of picketing against the war and doing stuff to give women access to birth control. Now, it might mean giving money to candidates and calling the voter rolls before an election."

hristine Yokoyama, a junior at Bonita Vista High School, likes to hang out with her friends, scope out cute guys at the mall, and perform with the school's nationally recognized show choir, Sound Unlimited. What was your first job?

"I worked as a sales associate for Anchor Blue [a teen clothing store] in Plaza Bonita for about two and a half months. I worked the floor, sold clothes, jackets, accessories, shoes, and I stayed late and straightened everything up and cleaned up

after [the customers]." What were your duties? "Pretty much I did everything, except stock. And no, I didn't stalk people. Basically, we split up the store into four or five areas, depending on how many people were working, and we each worked that area and were responsible for that area. We watched that area, watched for shoplifters, made sure everyone was happy, satisfied the cus-

tomers, and made sure there were

How'd you get this job? "My friend recommended I apply for it, and so I applied as a winter temporary worker, because of Christmas sales. He helped me kind of get the job."

Were you interviewed?

no empty shelves."

"Yes. First, we had a group interview, and then we went into the dark hallway in between all the stores. Then they sat us in metal chairs, and we did a bunch of team-working [exercises]

and told a lot about ourselves. Then we worked on the two solo interviews, and then came the offering of the job in the office. They asked, 'Why did you want this job? What kind of experiences have you had in the store? What's your fashion sense? How do you interact with people?'

Did you have to wear a uniform? "We didn't have to wear a uniform, but they asked us not to wear any brandname logos of our competitors, like Abercrombie and Fitch or American Eagle."

How much did vou earn?

"Seven dollars and 15 cents an hour." Was it worth it?

"I think so. First of all, that's, like, 40 cents above minimum wage. I also got really good hours because it was the Christmas season and they needed people there all the time. So I got maybe 200 bucks every two weeks or so, depending on how much I worked." How did you get along with your supervisor?

"I loved my supervisor; she's the best — maybe because she's Asian." Coworkers?

"Some of them are cool — like, all my friends, like Randy, who helped me get the job. Then I made friends with all his friends, so we were cool. But some people were just distant. Like, we would be working the same shift, but we wouldn't interact with each other: we wouldn't talk unless we needed serious help."

Describe your worst day on the job. "I guess it would have to be when I was closing the store. It was the day after Thanksgiving, and it's the biggest shopping day of the year, so everyone was there. It took me about two hours to straighten up the back wall, which is just old jeans, and it was horrible, because everything was a mess. We were there until 1:30 a.m." Your best day?

"I liked working one afternoon; everything just went well. We didn't have any shoplifters to prosecute or any bad customers — not bad customers, but unsatisfied customers. It was a sweetrunning day."

What was the worst mistake you made on the job?

"I gave someone the wrong change, and they came back. They were all 'You didn't give me the right change,' and I felt so stupid, but I was really tired, and I told her that."

Did you see any illegal activity while on the job?

"I didn't personally see any, but we know when someone steals because we find ripped-up tags on the floor, and it goes towards our losses. It's sad, really, counting up how many things we've lost or damaged. It sucks."

What did you spend your paycheck on? "Clothes at Anchor Blue, and I bought Christmas presents because it was Christmastime.... I think I tried to save half of it."

How did your nonworking friends treat you?

"Some of them wanted me to give them discounts or let them steal clothes, but I was, like, 'No, that can't work.' But usually it was, like, 'Wow! You have a job? Congratulations!' Your parents?

"They liked the idea of me working, but they didn't want my grades to suffer."

Did thev?

"Yeah; I think it was a combination of that and because I'm in a show choir and we have a lot of performances in December. That kind of bummed my grades down a little bit."

What kind of hours did you have? "Reasonable hours. I worked at least three times a week."

Did you get any discounts?

"Yeah, I got a 30 percent discount with my paycheck stub and once a month 50 percent off an outfit."

Are you still employed at this job? "No; I quit so I could go on vacation and to get my grades back up."

What were your overall feelings about doing this job?


"I had an awesome time; it was great. I met new people and got to see a lot of hot guys. No, seriously, there were, like, hot guys everywhere but that's not important. It was also nice thinking that I made my own money and that I didn't have to mooch off my parents for money to buy clothes and food and stuff."

What did you learn from this job?

"I guess I learned how to read people's body language and their tone of voice. It's an interactive environment, and you have to know what they're thinking. You don't want to annoy the customer or they'll walk out. You have to be able to talk to everybody." *Do you think having this job has made a difference in your life*?

"I don't know if it made a difference, but it certainly made an impact. It taught me responsibility, time management, money management, everything."

paper staff) and play football. Now that football season is over, he has more time to "think and talk to girls…but not necessarily in that order."

What was your first job? "I worked as a courtesy clerk at Albertsons last school year; that's basically the bottom of the pyramid."

What were your duties? "I was responsible for maintaining the car lot, made sure all the carts were in place, taking out trash, and sweeping. I was also in charge of bagging the groceries, cleaning the bathrooms, walking the store, restocking the shelves, and making sure all the customers were happy." *How'd you get this job?* "My dad is the store director for Albertsons." *Were you interviewed?* "It's kind of hard to be interviewed at Albertsons. It's more like you go there and they look at your background, and whether or not they want you is completely dependent upon the

season. But, yeah, it was already a given, because my dad worked there." *Did you have to wear a uniform?* "I wore a beige pair of pants and a blue shirt that said Albertsons in white on the top left corner. I also had a beige shirt that had a bunch of flying bags, carts, and groceries and stuff on it.... You had to wear shineable black shoes, beige pants or shorts, pants cannot be sagging, your shirt must be tucked in, and you also had to have a belt. Your hair can't be wild, your nails can't be too long; basically, you can't look all funky." *How much did you earn?* "Six seventy-five [an hour]. I felt like Kunta Kinte, the slave. I did an awful lot of work for such low pay."



Was it worth it? "Well, I'd say that the hard times come early, but if you come out strong and you maintain your strength, you can make [a lot]. Right now, my dad has a base pay of \$75,000, and that's just for where he is. I mean, growth potential is just amazing."

How did you get along with your supervisor? "Great, as long as you work hard and don't back-mouth and just do your job." Coworkers?

"I had a good relationship with my coworkers; however, I was a little upset because they didn't do anything. I was doing all the work." Describe your worst day on the job.

"I don't think I had a worst day...maybe right before July Fourth." Best day?

"You know, I think it's just because I had such a positive attitude. When you go into something with a positive attitude and you work positively, nothing negative will happen to you." What was the worst mistake you made on the job?

"I haven't really made a mistake. I've been around the business for a long time. It's just a lot of common sense." Did you see any illegal activity while on the job? "Yes; I actually suspected someone, because he had a basket full of groceries with no bags, but I couldn't do anything because we're not allowed to touch [the shoplifter] or say anything to them. The law has been made to protect the person who is stealing. So if you can't prove that they

were actually stealing it, then they'll get away with it." What did you spend your paycheck on? "Shit. Anything I could. Actually, all the money I made went to football." How did your nonworking friends treat you? " 'You got a job. Cool. Can I borrow something real quick?' But with friends, that's how it works. Whenever I was in the down, people helped me out, so it goes both ways." Your parents? "My mom expected me to buy a lot of groceries and stuff towards the house, so I'd buy dinners." What kind of hours did you have? "I couldn't work every single day because of football, and, as a minor, I'm only allowed to work a certain amount

of days, and so I had, like, Tuesday and Thursday for four hours and Saturday and Sunday for eight hours." Did you get any discounts? "Discounts...no. But what they do is, when you work for the union, you get privileges. Every time that you spend money at the store, you use a little card. For instance, you might end up winning a trip to Alaska or something." Are you still employed at this job? "I am not employed currently because at the time I had to pursue football." What were your overall feelings about doing this job? "I felt a lot of hope, because I realized that while it was a very hard job to do, the possibili-

ties were endless. After

you work there for a year, you get on the ladder the escalator, if you will - and if you keep working hard, you go from making \$7.25 an hour to making \$14, and that's because you're working in a department. After a department, you become a manager, then a store director, and then a district manager " What did you learn from this job? "I learned what a job can be like in terms of, when you work hard all the time, people will watch you." Do you think having this

job has made a difference in your life? "I think it has, because now it's given me a place

to fall back on. If something doesn't work out, if school goes bad, I'll just go back to Albertsons. I know I have a job."







What's vour job? "I'm an exhibit interpreter at the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center [in Balboa Park]." What are your duties? Ziggy and Iggy

Born in San Diego in 1950, Michael Page, in the mid-'70s, was living in La Jolla and playing bass in local bands when he met Elizabeth Ballard, an underground actress who lived in New York City. "You don't belong here," she told him. "You're wearing black fingernail polish. You've got dyed hair." New York was the center of art and culture. With \$200 in his pocket, Page headed crosscountry and moved in with Elizabeth, her boyfriend, and her son. Through a chance encounter, he met Sylvain Sylvain of the New York Dolls, a group that was just breaking up. Page joined Sylvain's new band, the Criminals, and they played Max's Kansas City until Sylvain was signed solo by RCA Records. Page's story continues below.

* * * At the time of our breakup, Sylvain and I were living together in a tiny little apartment that Serpico formerly had in Greenwich Village. My girlfriend Lisa, the one from San Diego who fell in love with Iggy Pop, came

to visit one time, and I'm sure she thought that Syl and I were gay, because this little place was ten by ten, and there was only one bed. But, no. I had a foam thing underneath and I slept on it. Sylvain and I would fall asleep at nighttime laughing. We sometimes wouldn't eat for two or three days in a row, and we were real bohemians living in New York City. But we would laugh ourselves to sleep. We were so broke it was funny.

A lot of groups came from out of town and passed through New York. I remember I saw Iggy play with David Bowie. David was playing keyboards with Iggy at the Palladium, and I went to see that. It was Iggy's tour and Blondie opened for him.

I saw Devo the first night they played at Max's Kansas City, and it was like, wow, who are these guys? It was a night when there was hardly anybody there. I went up to the dressing room to tell them that I was really entertained by the show, but there was no one there. And I'm not used to that. Usually there's a big party in the dressing room and everybody's drinking, and here are all these little college kids in boxer shorts and masks on. It was insane.

For drugs, we did cocaine. We did cocaine in the days when it wasn't addictive. Now, I'd done cocaine in San Diego when there were tons of cocaine. I'd met Peruvian and Colombian drug dealers, and I've got friends that are probably still doing prison time for it. I was lucky to pull out of that drug crap, actually, because people started dying. Right around the time when I first arrived in New York, I heard about the Stilettos. They had a guy in that group named Eric Emerson, who was in the Warhol crowd, and he was really well known and liked. Eric died of a heroin overdose at a party, and they pulled him out of the place and left him on the street so that the heat wouldn't come to their place. I remember hearing that and thinking that that was pretty cold, but that's what happens when you do dope.

See, I didn't know any heroin people here in San Diego. But coke was something you'd do for a little fun thing. You could drink more if you did a little coke. And there's that weird time period where coke was acceptable to my people. It was just something that you did.

I really never understood the heroin thing. The



first time I did heroin in New York, I thought it was coke, and then I threw up and got dizzy. Sylvain was really wary. Billy Murcia had died, and it was a big deal to him. It was called "doogie" in New York. And it was real easy to get a dime bag. You'd just go to the Lower East Side, get a dime bag of dope, and sniff it. Of course, everybody knows what happens with heroin. If you used heroin, you could become addicted. You could get addicted to it. You could overdose. You could die.

It's a crazy thing, because eventually I ended up getting addicted to alcohol, which is legal. I didn't get into alcohol because of a bad childhood or anything. It was just part of what we did on a daily basis. Alcohol was what we did. We drank. We drank a lot, and we drank all the time. But I never would really get stupid. I'd hear stories here and Michael Page and Iggy Pop

there that alcoholism was a progressive disease. And I don't remember the day that it actually happened, but I finally ended up being an alcoholic. See, I did a lot of touring for a lot of years. We were touching a lot of different bases and going back and forth and all over everywhere. And alcohol was *always there*!

* * *

When Sylvain got signed to RCA and went solo, I was





ready to come back to San Diego and call it quits because I figured that I had done really well in rock and roll. But the day before I was leaving, I talked with this girl. She was one of the girls who'd worked with the Dolls and then worked at the Beacon Theater in New York. Then she somehow had gotten hooked up with Chubby Checker. She asked if I'd be interested in auditioning for Chubby Checker's road gig. And it was, like, "Yeah, of course." So I auditioned with Chubby Checker. I didn't get the gig originally because my playing style was pretty simple. But the next thing I know, they've reconsidered. So I got the gig with Chubby, and we did 340 shows a year.

Now, I'm switching from the underground bands to Chubby Checker, and Chubby has an interesting history. He's the only guy in the entire history of rock and roll to have a number-one song that was number one twice. Chubby started in the late '50s, and he was like Chuck Berry. He was always around from then on. Once he was established, he was just there.

Chubby Checker owed a lot to Dick Clark, and Dick Clark's wife named him. His original name was Ernest Evans, and he was a chicken plucker from Pennsylvania. And one time Dick Clark and his wife heard Chubby sing and asked him who his favorite singer was. Chubby said Fats Domino. So Dick Clark's wife named him Chubby Checker after the Fats Domino name. And they made him. Chubby Checker may have started in the '50s, but he never quit rock and roll. He just never went away and was always out there playing. Nonstop. That's how he made his bread and butter. He just played. And if he's not playing here, he's in another country.

Chubby hired me to modernize his band, because when I showed up, I was wearing red patent leather. Chubby needed to teach his guys not to wear street clothes. They needed to be taught that they were doing a show, because they'd forgotten this. Chubby's whole thing was falling apart, and he needed new, fresh energy.

He needed to remember with that it was Showtime. We set might travel a long time in buses, sometimes for six with days in a row. But the stage of

was still a stage, and the stage was Showtime. The band had forgotten that and wore the same clothes onstage that they woke up out of the bunks in. So I taught them how to dress. And that was it.

These guys were, like, who is this guy? And the first week I was paid, I told Chubby, "You don't need to do that. You don't have to pay me. I'm just having the time of my life. Meeting all these people and playing all those places." I'm single, and I'm playing bass for Chubby Checker. The guys in the band thought I was nuts.


It would be easier to name the places that we didn't play than the places that we did. We didn't play Russia, and we didn't play China. Other than that, I played everywhere with Chubby. It was my first time on the international scene and the first time I'd been to the jungles of Africa, and it just changed my life. Tasmania. Tanzania. I didn't even know there was a Tasmania. I thought that Tasmania was the old Warner Brothers cartoon guy, the little Tasmanian devil. I didn't know that there was a real place that was called that. It was exactly like San Diego, with blue skies and

eucalyptus.

Chubby Checker didn't write the song "The Twist." Hank Ballard of the Midnighters wrote it but didn't get a hit with it. Then Chubby - through a matter of timing and Dick Clark — came along and got a hit with it. Hank Ballard was in a swimming pool one time at a hotel and heard the song come over the radio. And it was just, like, wow, that's great. I'm finally on the radio. And halfway through it, he thought, wait a minute ---that's not me! That's not my voice! What's up with this!

Chubby's whole thing was just bizarre, because he didn't write any of his hits. Was he a good singer? Chubby was just Chubby. He's got one of those personalities. I saw him play last year at one of the casinos. And when he saw me, he jumped through the crowd and said, "I love this man!" Chubby took me all over the world. That's when I learned what real rock and roll touring was all about. Three hundred forty shows a year. Nonstop. And many

times, two to three shows a night. That's real rock and roll. And I got to meet all the guys I'd heard about earlier on in my life. Chuck Berry. Little Richard. These were the first rock and rollers, and they were the real thing. Bo Diddley, Jerry Lee Lewis, even the Beach Boys!

I'd always loved the history of rock and roll, but I never dreamed I would do this stuff. We'd do radio interviews, and I'd get to hang out with the Chiffons and the Shirelles, and for me, it was a dream come true. See, these other groups were all playing the same shows that Chubby was. I got the chance to shake James Brown's hand!

Chuck Berry turned out to be an asshole to a lot of people, but I got along with him really well, for some reason. I've got a cool picture of him. He had a standard thing he would do just before he went on. He would tell the promoters that he needed more money. And it was something that he was known for doing. He'd have them sign a check or use a credit card, and he was notorious for doing this. I've got a cool picture of him signing a contract and using my back to do it. I had to hold his guitar while he was signing it. Some photographer was there, and it is one of the coolest pictures. I played the Chicago Fest with Chubby Checker, Little Richard, Chuck Berry, and Bo Diddley.

Tom Waits, the singer from National City, ended up being a good friend of mine. We did a TV show together in New York City, and then somehow we both ended up in Australia doing The Don Lane Show, the equivalent of the Johnny Carson show. And I was in the dressing room, of course, with jet lag and drunk. And I heard somebody playing the piano who had been drinking, and he was way in the back room. Sure enough, it was Tom. And he was, like, "Are you following me?" I have a cosmic thing with Tom. There's a soul thing happening there.

After I retired from active touring, Char and Nina and I ended up in this little town in Northern California on the Russian River called Monte Rio. It's a lit-



tle town in the redwoods,

and God's kissed this area.

The Russian River spills into

the Pacific Ocean, and there's

leen and his three kids. I still don't know how all this stuff happens. Being with Chubby

Being with Chubby Checker was really safe, because people came to see Chubby Checker for a particular reason. They came for nostalgia and to have a good time doing the twist. There was nothing threatening in Chubby's shows or in the audience, whereas everything else I had been involved in up to that time was threatening. And you didn't need to have an opinion or be judgmental or whatever. The people were all there to have a good time and dance. It was all very relaxed and a real fun thing. And there was a lot of love. Chubby expressed a lot of love, and the audience gave it back to him. It was crazy and just wonderful. I went on *American Bandstand* with Chubby, and I met Dick Clark many times. The TV-show stuff. We did it all.

The downside of working with Chubby was just the endless, endless, endless traveling. Now, I'd wanted to travel and get from point A to point B. But it was planes, trains, boats, and buses, and it was just never ending.

When Chubby married Miss World from Amsterdam, in the '60s, it was a big deal. It was black and white, and all that stuff. And I remember Chubby's mom opened her mouth and said, "This should never be happening."The interracial stuff. But Chubby's just the coolest guy on the planet.

Chubby used to like to drive the tour bus to relieve some of his nervous energy. He'd be driving along in a silver jock strap and silver boots that went up to his knees. And he'd be drinking cold duck. My nickname was "Sid" in that band. Sid Vicious. That's about all those guys knew about me. And Chubby would say, "Come on up, Sid, and talk to me." And I'd keep him awake while we'd be traveling. I love that man dearly.

But I finally said to Chubby one time, "No más. I can't handle it anymore. I have an apartment on Fifth Avenue in New York, and I'm only there three days out of the year." It was getting to be too much, and I'd finally run my gamut of touring. And I started thinking right about then, I wonder if I'm ever going to be a dad. I'd been living in New York City for a long time, and I was ready for a change. So I made a real amicable change with Chubby and told him that I was tired. We went through personnel stuff, and then I told him, "You know what, let me work with you until you get somebody. I'll go to auditions and make sure you get the right guy." And he

said, "It really hurts me bad to see you do this."

After Chubby, I played a stint with Jerry Lee Lewis, and that was a big mistake, and it was a short deal. It was an odd time in Jerry Lee's life, and I understand it hasn't gotten any better. But I thought that maybe if I got some real pro rock and roll guys under my belt that I could be looked to as a guy who maybe knew what he was doing, and it would be good for my credits. But Jerry Lee — you know, the guns, drunk. I won't even go into it.

Brenda Lee was a girl we'd do things with, and the Coasters. The Coasters were funny, because they had three or four different bands. I just saw them recently, and two of the guys from the Coasters remembered me. One of them said, "Mikey, what are you doing?" And I'm like, holy shit, man, these guys remember me. But the Coasters were funny. I remember seeing one of the Coasters playing at a show in New York City, and two days later, we were in Tasmania playing with the

Coasters, and it wasn't even the same guys. So, I don't know. But Jerry Lee was a big mistake, first of all because I had told Chubby that I didn't want to tour and that I wanted to slow down. But it was just like going from the frying pan into the fire. It was just nuts, and there was going to be trouble. It was a real bad vibe, and it was a big mistake. So, I jumped out of that

really quickly. I was getting ready to come back to San Diego and visit my best friend Pat Looby, and I had the plane ticket and everything. I was living with a girlfriend uptown named Patty Kohler, from the Kohler fixture company, who was a multimillionaire fashion model in New York. You know, you get some perks when you do rock and roll. And girls was one of them.

But Patty was serious about me. She really liked me a lot, and I really liked her a lot. But I was also used to floating around and going from one city to another. So I didn't have time for a relationship, and she really got threatened by that.

But I got a phone call



just as I was getting ready to come back to San Diego. It was Roberta Bailey, one of those people who pops up in my life all the time. She asked me if I would like to audition for Iggy Pop. So it was, like, "Yeah, right." I thought it was a joke.

But I went to the audition. I think I was the 50th guy that auditioned, and I came with my Tom Waits hat, sharkskin suit, and cigar. And I don't know why this happened, but I walked in and they said, "You've got the gig." I think they were tired of auditioning guys. They didn't know that I knew Iggy from the past. They knew about my deal with the New York Dolls, though. So I get hired to play with Iggy Pop. I'd said to the guys, "You should probably let me play a little anyway, so that you can see what I do." But they were, like, "No, you're that guy that played with Syl, and you've just come back from Africa. You've got a passport, and you can play. We know that

already."


So I took Glen Matlock's place in Iggy's band. Glen was from the Sex Pistols. I found out that Iggy had finished up the New Values tour, and he'd gotten tired of the foreign guys in his band. One day he woke up and he couldn't handle the accents. He had a French keyboard player, an English bass player, and Ivan was a Czech. Another guy was from Germany. So Iggy said to his manager, "You know what, just give me American kids." It was, like, one day it was everybody out of the pool. The drug and the drink thing got involved, and Iggy just wanted a fresh thing. So that's what happened.

There were 50 guys who had auditioned before me, and I got it without playing, so that's kind of weird. The guy just before me was from Johnny Winter's band. He was an insane player, and he's played all over the place. But that guy started talking salary and wanted to know how much he would be making here, and what would be happening there. So Iggy took him and another guy aside and said, "Who wants this gig the most?" And the guys said, "I do, I do." And Iggy said, "Well, go out in the hallway and fight about it, and whoever wins the fight can have the gig." So I don't know. It was crazy. But I got the gig. And I had three days to learn an entire album's worth of songs for Iggy's European tour. But it was Iggy's *Soldier* album, one of my favorites.

The problem with Iggy's music was that it was different from anything I'd ever played before. There was no form or structure to it. I mean, I come from three-chord blues progressions that are predictable, and I know where they're going. So my job is cut out plain and simple, and I know what I need to do. I need to hold down the fort. I need to work with the drummer and lay down a foundation for the other musicians to work with. That's how I got my gigs, because I have an understanding of that. I don't push the bass as a showman instrument. I know nothing about slapping. I'm not into bass tech-








nique. The only technique I do is work with the drummer, listen to his bass drum, and lay down that solid foundation.

Iggy's music was different because he had no chord structure. He did a song called "I'm a Conservative," and it had 32 different changes. And before the European tour, I had three days to learn his stuff. So I'm in there with a paper and pencil at my girlfriend's place. She's trying to help and also mad at me because I'm going out on the road again. I tried to do it without drugs and booze, and it was hard work. Three days in a row, with a pencil and paper and a record player. Going over the songs over and over again. Writing down the names of the changes. I had to get familiar with the songs, and it was nothing that I came from. It was not my



school.

The Dolls didn't compare with this because they basically had three-chord things. And with the Criminals, I was doing walking jazz bass. And I could play I did a good job of faking it, or I finally got to know the stuff well enough. Eventually, I ended up where I could do the songs in my sleep, and I didn't have to think about it and could

that stuff a whole lot easier than I could play Iggy's stuff. Iggy's meter structure would also change. I mean, it's no big deal to a real technical musician. But to me, a simple blues guy, it made no sense. He writes things that are going to please him, and he never follows any structure at all. So the pressure was on.

I would much rather play music that I'm comfortable with and that I know I'm doing a good job with than to be up there wondering what key a song is in. And, oops, that change is coming up that I'm not really familiar with. So I did the best I could and worked as hard as I could. And either concentrate on dodging bottles. I was with Iggy Pop from 1980 to around 1983, or something like that.

At that time, I still didn't know very much about Iggy. I just knew that he was Iggy Pop, and he moved in circles that I wasn't really concerned about. Iggy came from Michigan. The MC5 were also from there. So there were a few things that were happening, and a movement was there. I think their sound had something to do with the fact that this was where they manufactured cars. It was something about the rhythm of the machinery, or whatever it was, that ended up having

an influence on some of the music that came from there.

The first time I saw Iggy do his gymnastics was at one of the first shows we played on this European tour. I take that back. I'd seen him at the Palladium in New York City, when Blondie opened for him and David Bowie played the keyboards. Johnny Thunders, Sylvain, Dave Johansen, and I went to see that show, and it was, like, wow! Iggy came out in a gunnysack. Some roadie pulled him out of the gunnysack, and we didn't even know he was in there. They just pulled him out of this bag. At that moment, all eyes were on David, because it's like, wow, David Bowie. Iggy also had Hunt and Tony Sales, Soupy Sales's kids, who were playing drum and bass. It was just a really great, great band.

See, Iggy's done that for a lot of people. Remember Joan Jett? Iggy had Joan Jett open for us, and then she got the hit with "I Love Rock and Roll." Iggy was really insightful and tried to help bands out when he could. It's true that David helped Iggy, but Iggy also helped David a whole lot. It was a 50-50 deal there. Whatever David has done for Iggy was kind of expected. But whatever Iggy's done for David, David has gotten a lot out of it. Where do you think David's Ziggy Stardust came from? Ziggy and Iggy. Iggy actually told me one time, "I know that a lot of people get a lot of stuff from me."

In former days, way back in the era of the Stooges, Iggy rented a big chateau. It was a huge castle from Douglas Fairbanks's place, with the entry, the swimming pool, and the whole deal. And the band would just play and do drugs. David would come on occasion, suck up whatever Iggy was doing, and then leave. He was learning. David would run with it and make a lot of money.

of something or a roach, and he wasn't cleaned up at all.

But we started off on the European tour. Our first stop was London, and it was a big deal. Like I said, everything was sold out way in advance. We were doing the Soldier album, and it got a pretty good response, especially in Europe. I loved the music, and the whole thing was just insane, you know. I mean, the bus we had, and so on. We would take buses

time doing this. I just had


just represented all this stuff

Don't forget adrenaline. I can't forget my brain. Iggy can pick words out of the air, and it's something that I admire about him. I can see him doing it, and I've seen it happen with other guys, like William Burroughs. He'd just pick thoughts out of the air and randomly communicate them in a way that I admired. I wish I could do that. I think a lot of people wish that they could communicate on the level that he does.

Iggy's weaknesses were booze and drugs. Now, this was a physical thing that's right there in front of you. Other than that, I don't know what his weaknesses were. He's a show-biz guy, so he doesn't trust people very well. A lot of times after a show, I'd be blown away by some of the girls he would end up with. You'd figure that it would be the hightech fashion girl, but it would be that little dumpy thing in the corner with the new Mohawk. And he'd grab her and hang with her because he wanted to know what she was all about. What made her tick. I liked that.

David Bowie also knew that art form of turning the conversation to finding out all about you. David's heard it all. What are you going to tell David Bowie? "I've got all your albums, and I've been loving you for forever.""What were you really saying in your songs?""Were you the Diamond Dog?"



You know, what are you going to say to David? He's heard these things a billion times before. He's a sweetheart, but he's been there, done that.

What did we do with groupies on tour? Loved them. That's one of the perks. There were so many girls of quality.

You'd get the professionals. And Iggy, I think, at one point got a little concerned, and that was one of my concerns, that maybe we were getting away from really doing the rock and roll thing. Drugs and girls and the booze were supposed to be perks that come along afterwards. So we had strict rules in the dressing room before we went on. A good half hour before our performance, no one was allowed in the dressing room. It was just the guys. The girls and everybody had to split. I always remained focused, and I was extremely loyal. I think that was one of the things that Iggy could count on with me. That loyalty thing that was happening.

And I'd never get too self-indulgent before a show. I think once, out of all the shows I played with him, I drank a little bit too much sake and I wasn't quite with it. And, you know, this is a job. It's what I'm being paid to do. We'd only play for an hour a night, and it wasn't too much to ask to try to keep it together. And after the show was over, you could do anything you wanted.

We did the European tour, came back, and did a North American tour of the Soldier album, and that was a real long tour. Then we recorded the Party album. We did that at the Record Plant, and John Lennon had just finished recording there. We came in, and the piano bench was still warm from him doing the song "Imagine." It was too much — the white piano and the whole deal. Dire Straits were in there recording too. I hadn't heard too much about them, but I knew a little bit about what they were about. And we ended up talking shop. But that was my first shot at a really hunky-dory studio. The real deal and stuff, and quite an experience.

I saw the amount of money that was spent for that album. I mean, they wanted strings, and so they brought in the New York Philharmonic. Strings! For an Iggy Pop album. That was really a very unlikely project. We were signed with Arista at the time, and Arista was going to try to do what they could to sort of pump him. They got some business guys together, and they came up with everything wrong. They hired Tommy Boyce to produce it, from Boyce and Hart, the songwriting team that wrote "Last Train to Clarksville" for the Monkees. And the next thing that happens is that we've got this guy producing us with strings. And it was, like, what's wrong with this picture? Everything was wrong with it. They were trying to make Iggy be commercial.

Boyce is not a big-name producer in my eyes. The Monkees! Come on, give me a break. But Jimi Hen-

drix opened for the Monkees, so what can I say? But out of that album, the song "Bang Bang" happened. David and Tina Turner did a version of "Tonight" and scored a hit. We also recorded a version of "Sea of Love," which Robert Plant got a hit with later on. Iggy calls it his DOG album and I don't blame him, but I had fun doing it anyway.

* * *

I met David Bowie in Berlin when I was on one of the first tours that I did with Iggy. Iggy told me that David might be there, and I asked him, "How do you know that?" And he said, "Well, you can see his little butterflies." David had people that would come into an event and would clear it with security up front. They would make sure that they had a place to take David, because David was a big shit in those days. David had this girl, Coco, who was his personal secretary, and she took care of everything. You knew if you saw Coco that David was there. So we're playing the song "China Girl," and we're in Berlin. It was one of those times when the crowd wasn't superaggressive. They just admired Iggy. The whole show had been sold out for months, so they took it easy on the bottle throwing.

Well, anyway, we're doing "China Girl," and I'm looking in the front row at this guy who had his hand up in the air, and he was reaching out. And he was, like, signaling me to come and pull him out of the crowd. So I went and pulled him out of the crowd, and I realized, holy shit, it's David Bowie!

He looked normal. At that time, he and Iggy were shopping at JCPenney and Montgomery Ward. They were making a point of doing things like that — to try to be as normal as they could possibly be. But even when they put those clothes on, they're still not normal. So I kind of recognized him, but I didn't think at first that this was who it really was.

Well, it was. So I pulled him up onstage. And it was a cool way to meet the dude, because other than that, how are you going to meet David Bowie? Stand in line and try to get an autograph and tell him that you've got all his albums?

So David jammed "China Girl" with us. I remember he asked me the key of the song while we were playing so that he could accompany us on the keyboard. But when you try to yell something like that in music, and you look at the visual thing with your mouth — you're trying to say E or G or C. Well, they're all the same, and you can't do it. So I tried to write it in the air that the key was C.

David picked up on it, and we did the song. Then we played "Funtime" and "Sister Midnight," and it was, like, *how cool!* We finished up, and David came back to the dressing room with us. And I did what I do best. I just shut the fuck up, instead of getting all over him. David kept trying to open up a beer and was busting off the tops and stuff. So I opened one up for him. And Iggy was, like,





"Disciplinary action taken against responsible officials did not appear adequate in light of the gravity of their misconduct," Kaplan said, noting that the Navy "has not yet scheduled welding and NDT inspection audits for West Coast NAVAIR locations." According to her March 13 news release, "These audits are critical to the extent that they may allow the Navy to discover and repair other noncompliant welds on Navy vessels, that may otherwise pose a danger to public safety."

But Kaplan will not be around to follow up. Last week, she resigned her position as special counsel after it became obvious George W. Bush would not reappoint her. Next month she will join the D.C. law firm of Bernabei and Katz, a plaintiffs' practice specializing in sexual harassment and whistleblowers. "In these times of heightened concern about national security, it is very important that OSC be viewed as a credible, non-partisan advocate on behalf of [federal employee] whistleblowers," Kaplan said in her farewell message, adding she hoped "this goal, among others, has been achieved during my tenure, and that it will continue to be given a high priority."

All of which leaves Shott, who lives in Oceanside with her husband, also a North Island worker, in more than a bit of limbo. She's been removed as a welder in Voyage Repair. Even before Kaplan departed, Shott says she knew her career at North Island was virtually finished, and she's filed a civil suit against the government, alleging sexual harassment by her fellow workers. Recently she sat down in her lawyer's Sorrento Valley office to talk about what she argues is a heavy-maintenance system gone completely out of control and then covered up, jeopardizing the lives of Navy pilots and carrier crewmembers.

Matt Potter: Let's just start with a general bio about you...where you were born, where you grew up. Kristin Shott: I grew up in Vallejo, California, which is a nuclear submarine town, small town. I started working for a nuclear submarine base called Mare Island in 1983 — I was ap-

MP: What kind of work?

KS: I started doing secretarial, and then I went into welding on nuclear submarines, and then I transferred down here as a welder.

MP: How did you get interested in welding? How did that happen? KS: Well, the base was going into BRAC [Base Realignments and Closures], so they were having a lot of layoffs. And one of my supervisors had mentioned to me that my position was being targeted for abolishment and the apprenticeship program had opened and that I should take the test, so I took the test. It just kind of accelerated for me going from white collar to blue collar, which was a great change. I was really glad I did it. MP: And that was '83?

MP: And that was 83? **KS:** Um, yes. I became a welder in '88 or '89, somewhere around there and have been ever since.

MP: And how do you train for that? How did you get certified? **KS:** They have an apprenticeship program that's in collaboration with the junior college there. It's a collaborative effort with the Navy and the colleges in that area.

MP: Were your folks in the Navy?

KS: No, but both my parents worked for the military, for either Mare Island or Alameda. Both bases, of course, are closed now, so... MP: Did you graduate

from high school? KS: Oh, yes. I graduated from high school and then went to college, and eventually I was picked up permanently at Mare Island and then went into the apprenticeship. MP: When you first went to work at 15, you were still in high school then? KS: Yes. MP: So it was like a part-time job? KS: A student-aid program. MP: Oh, I see. **KS:** And then from


there, I just continued into college. MP: And what college did you go to? **KS:** Solano Community College. MP: And so did you get an AA from that? KS: I'm one class away but I'm going back into college at the end of this month, actually, to continue my bachelor of science degree. MP: And so, after you got your certification, you became a welder? Is that how it works? **KS:** Well, it's a four-year program. You go through a four-year training program along with college-required courses, trade-related courses. And then after the four years, I graduated. MP: Four years of college and ...? KS: And hands-on training. There's certain levels of the welding program that you had to qualify at each level

before you're promoted up into the, you know, final grade of [mechanics]. MP: That's a standard thing that everybody that works for the Navy, theoretically, goes through? KS: Well, for nuclear submarine bases, yes. No, it's not a standard. They are picking up the practice here in San Diego. They just started the apprenticeship program at my agency probably about eight months ago. They started it back up when

they finally realized that, you know, the skills that they're required aren't meeting government standards, so they have gone back into the apprenticeship program, yes, for San Diego. I think they had been out for, like, 15 years. But a lot of the larger shipyards do have apprenticeships. Bremerton [in Washington state] has a very large one and, of course, my base did. Nuclear submarine bases are very specialized because of pressure and stuff on


the submarines. You have to be extremely trained at the highest level possible. MP: Right. KS: You know, so you don't have any casualties, of course. MP: Right. KS: There's a lot of work involved in it. MP: So you did that in...you worked up there until what year? KS: Um, 1994. Until I transferred down here, or 1995. I don't even remember! I think it's 1995. October 1995. MP: And on the submarines you just did, sort of, any kind of welding, or are there specialties? KS: Well, I went through a lot of different types of training. You know, you have certain levels during your apprenticeship. You have your first level, which is just basic structure welding. And

then you end up doing, like, patch crews and pipe welding, which are more specialized. So, I finished all of my phases through there, yes. So I did get a lot of the specialized training. **MP:** So you could rotate around and do different things?

KS: Correct, correct. And then I worked a lot on target teams, where I was traveling quite a bit too. And there was different certifications for a different type of year with different types of metal that were required through the Navy.

MP: Were there a lot of women there, or were you one of many or one of few?

KS: At Mare Island, I think we had approximately 10 females out of 500 when I first started. Here I'm the only female! And it really shows. There's not

pretty amazing. **MP:** But up there, was it different? Was the environment different?

KS: Northern California is night and day from Southern California. Yes, you could really see the difference! There's more females, I would say, in Northern California than Southern California in the trades, definitely. Definitely a large attitude difference. **MP:** So even way back then in '83, like, 20 years ago? **KS:** I didn't really notice it at Mare Island. It's when I came down here is when I noticed more of the discriminated attitudes towards females in the trades. Up there I think it was more common, so people were adjusted to it already by the time I got into the field. MP: When you left

there in '94, was it still about 10 women for the 500 people or had they grown?

KS: When I left it was

You know, my position's very physical, so, you know, a lot of the women that get into it, you either have to be able to accept the responsibilities as any man can, or you don't and you transfer out. So I've seen a lot of women who just felt it was too physical, so they went into other trades. But I prefer welding. Is that still basically in place, the one that you went through? **KS:** They do this in Bremerton. MP: Up there? **KS:** At the shipyard there, it is. It's identical to the type that I went through. 
changes that I don't know — I don't see that they're more specialized towards the trade. I see it's more specialized toward, um, the college aspect. The trade of my caliber takes at least a good ten years to really start to get proficient in it. It's not an overnight process. It takes a long time.

MP: So you worked a little on subs here, but not a lot?

KS: ... I worked a lot of subs here for Mare Island. At North Island I did not work on any submarines. Destroyers,

aircraft carriers, helicopters, and airplanes, and mobile facilities, of course. Everything but subs! MP: Everything but. KS: Yes. MP: So you came down and, well, you said early that you noticed a change in climate or atmosphere. KS: Oh, yes. MP: Did you notice that right away, or what was your initial impression when you came down here? KS: I noticed it right off the bat, that it was... I don't know, it's really

hard when you — a lot of people were really amazed that I was a female welder. It just kind of blew everybody away: management and workers alike. They'd never worked with a female in my trade. There's a lot of, like, machinists that are females, but not ones that actually go on the job sites. So, it's pretty unusual. Overwhelming! MP: Right here. KS: Yeah. MP: Yeah. And how did that manifest itself? KS: Um, it depended on the actual person. There was a lot of hostilities for certain types, the older men I noticed seemed to be really hostile, old school. You know, women are supposed to be pregnant in the kitchen; a lot of people have mentioned that to me. I've learned to basically ignore a lot of it. And then you have the other ones that just don't feel I have a right to be here, in their trade, and they feel threatened. Especially at my skills, you know. If I meet the same standard as them, they feel threatened, and it becomes a hostility issue. MP: Do they make remarks? KS: Oh, yes! MP: Like what? What do they say? **KS:** "Why're you doing a man's job?" I shouldn't be in the trades, and I'd be better off being behind a desk, and I'm beating up my body, and da-da-da. You know. And then, of course, I'm always sleeping with somebody! You know, the rumors: if I get along with a coworker, the next thing you know, I'm hearing rumors that I'm sleeping with him, which is totally ridiculous. I call that the drill motor spins. Men gossip a lot more than women! It's unbelievable! MP: How many women were on the crew down here versus up there? KS: As far as welding? MP: Yes. KS: Uh, I'm the only female in Southern California, for the federal government. MP: Was and are now? KS: As far as I know, I'm the only female welder for the federal government in Califor-

nia, period, now. MP: Now. KS: Yeah. MP: Okay. **KS:** There were a few that work for private industry. Not many. MP: So, how many people are there? How many people in your unit or in the welding trades down here? How many men? KS: I think there's total, base-wide there's, like, 12 of us. MP: Twelve? KS: Right. We've had a lot of retirements recently and stuff so, you know, of course, I think there's, like, four on the aircraft line. Welders, no females. There's seven welders on Voyage Repair Team. And two within maintenance and, of course, I'm the only one at Mobile Facilities. MP: That's just North Island. KS: That's just North

Island, correct. They do have several, probably about a couple dozen at Point Loma and probably a couple dozen at 32nd Street, and there's no females there at all, as far as welders go for the Navy. MP: So, Voyage Repair Team, did you join that right away when you came down? KS: No. Originally, I was hired by the aircraft line. **MP:** The aircraft line. And what did that entail? **KS:** Welding aircraft parts. F-18s, S-3s, helicopter repairs, flightline cable repairs, a lot of different varieties concerning both the airplanes and helicopters. MP: So, in other words, this stuff, obviously, it breaks down, and you come into work everyday and what would your daily routine be

like? Do they give you a sheet and say, "This is broken, go out and do it"?...how does that work?

KS: No, it's totally different than what I was used to. When you work on the aircraft line, you come in, and they have priority sets. So, you have airplane parts that have paperwork attached to it that needs repairing. It identifies what the repairs are. On Voyage Repair Team, it's different; it just depends. If you have workload for the aircraft carriers, then, of course, you go out with the crew on that. But when I first started there, it was probably almost 80 percent of the work was done on destroyers. Repairs to destroyers. And now, it's, of course, because of the investigation, that's swapped. Now they're

not working on destroyers, just aircraft carriers. So, I don't quite understand what's going on with that whole deal. MP: But when you first got here, you were doing airplanes? KS: Correct. MP: And what would they say; would you just go out? I mean, what do you weld on an airplane? KS: Wing flaps. Just different parts of motor parts and L-125 repairs that are needed for the airplane squadrons that are there at the base, that attach to the base. MP: Do they develop cracks? Or they just come loose? **KS:** There are some parts that are cracked. And there's manufacturing that had to be done. You may be making new parts for the airplane, and things have to be welded together.

MP: And so, you get to work really early in the morning? **KS:** We work probably 6:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. is the standard there at North Island. **MP:** Is there any reason for that? **KS:** That's normal for the federal government. MP: Just start early and end early? **KS:** Well, the shipyards usually run about 7:00. They start about 7:00, because, you know, they're dealing with the military. 'Cause the military usually musters about 7:00 a.m. MP: I see. KS: So, it usually takes about a half an hour to get aboard ship and all your... So, it's different on a shipyard than it would be on a manufacturing site. But I have to get a lot of things done before the

squadrons arrive.

MP: And so you worked

on the airplane side of it for how long? From '94? **KS:** A year. **MP:** About a year? KS: Yeah. MP: And then what happened after that? KS: I went to Voyage Repair Team. MP: And what is Voyage Repair Team? **KS:** Voyage Repair Team is a group of people that basically specialize in launch and recovery. A [resting] gear type repairs for the aircraft carriers on the destroyers. memory. Basically it's a visual landing platform that, when the planes come in, they have lights, green and red. It helps them land on the top of the carriers and on top of the destroyers adequately.

MP: So they call it Voyage Repair Team, but it specializes in this particular thing about the catapults and all that? KS: Right, right. Landing lights, anything to do with the planes landing and leaving. You know, the tailhook assemblies and -MP: Tailhook stuff? KS: Right. Jet-blast doors. Launching equipment. The engines that are attached to the launching equipment and stuff like that. They

also do RMC work, which is Regional Maintenance Contracts. They used to do like weapon elevators and stuff like that but they've gotten away from that. MP: I see. And the idea is that the unit becomes specialized, so they know how to deal with any issues that arise? Is that the idea? KS: Correct, correct. And then overhauls and stuff like that. Repairs. You know, 'cause you do have a lot of problems with the older aircraft carriers. Of course. After so many flights they have certain guidelines that they have to follow as far as maintenance, [regional] maintenances and stuff. The

military, the military has a standard. MP: So, you started working there about '95 or so? KS: Correct. MP: I assume now we're sort of morphing into this situation. What came up? How did you know that there was a problem or what was manifesting itself? KS: Well, you know, they were assigning me to systems that were critical systems. But I noticed that they weren't doing the appropriate testings that are required when you do new installations or repairs. You have certain NDI requirements, which is Non-Destructive Testing and you have certain hydro test-

ing that's supposed to be taking place and they weren't performing that. And then, of course, as time progressed, I could see that they were taking a lot of short corners on specific projects in order for them to get the workload over the contractors. Especially on the destroyers, it was a real big issue, more so than the carriers. I know that focuses a lot on the carriers because the destroyer disclosures haven't started yet. They've separated that one off, so... MP: What was happening? **KS:** They were directing me to do job assignments that I felt were dangerous to the mili-

tary personnel, and I started balking at performing certain jobs because I felt that if they weren't doing the proper inspections, that it could create a problem in the future. And then they would ask me to find problems, and then when I'd find the problems, they'd get upset at the results, so it just kind of cycled into a large problem. MP: So, when we talk about they and them, these were civilian managers? KS: Correct. Supervision. MP: And you'd bring it to them and they'd just sort of shine you on? KS: Basically. Or tell me to go do it. Or they were really good about — if

they could see that I was making an issue that was legit, they would wait 'til overtime and then pull another welder that was willing to work overtime. You know, 'cause they're very money-hungry people. That type of work, they work overtime 10 to 12 hours a day, seven days a week, months on end. And it's all about money. And, you know, trips. They love to do their trips to Japan and stuff like that. You make a lot of money, but... **MP:** These were the welders? KS: Yeah. They knew which welders would go do an illegal job and not question. MP: What was the su-

KS: No. I think there was a lot to do with not being able to afford the equipment, the testing equipment. Not affording, or not understanding the guidelines. They're not trade-related.... So a lot of them didn't understand what I was talking about. Or they thought I was just trying to create problems, and that was not the case. Although in their investigation, which actually revealed itself about six months ago, is they've known since 1983. I'm the second whistleblower, not the first And a lot of people don't understand. I'm not the first person that reported

this. I'm the second. And everybody thinks that I'm trying to create harm to the agency now, and that's not true. The agency's known about this since 1983. Management that is in charge now knew about it, so when I started bringing it up, they started attacking me, and I didn't know until six months ago why. You know, I've been going through this for six years.... There was an inci-

dent, I believe it was on the Constellation, and two or three sailors were killed when the jet-blast door came down. From the gist that I get from reading a lot of the documents that I've read just re-

cently is somebody had filed a disclosure against the agency in reference to problems with welding. Of course, I don't know who that person is. That's not information the agency's provided to me. But, there was apparently an agreement that was made that the welders needed to be certified, and the NDI was an issue. Well, after that settlement was done, everything went out the window. And then here I come back in 1995, which was almost eight years later, and we're still dealing with a lot of the same managers, and they knew about it. It was news to me; I didn't know anything about it until six months ago.

This is six years later even, and after voicing the concerns, they got nervous, I think. **MP:** Where was that? Was the Constellation here? KS: Yes. **MP:** The work was done here? KS: Yes. Yes. I'm not sure exactly what happened on the Constellation, but it had something to do with the piping, probably the hydraulic lines or something, just like the Stennis, which I was working on. I don't know exactly what happened on that, but I see with working for Voyage Repair, they weren't doing a lot of the testings that they were required to do, and it ultimately


leads to other problems. Just like if you change your brakes out, and vou don't bleed vour brakes, you can have air in the lines. Of course, that's going to create problems down the line, and that's what I've seen with the jet-blast doors. Just a lot of improper things being done.

That was the main incident, was the jetblast doors with the two sailors on the Stennis that lost their legs, unfortunately. Constella*tion* happened in early '80s. Somebody did disclosure. It was basically shut up, and then I came around in '97 with it and, you know, of course an incident happened two years later because nobody

took any action on my disclosures. The second incident, two sailors had lost their legs. MP: That was number two.

KS: Right, the first one, they actually died. The sailors were killed

I originally spoke to my superiors and got nowhere. I went to the union and got nowhere. I went to the dock captain's hotline and got nowhere. Eventually I ended up in [the Equal Employment Opportunity office] doing an affidavit that went nowhere! I thought they were trying to correct it. I didn't realize that there were some issues in '83 that were going to create a problem with the agency. So I eventu-



ceiving from some of the management within the area, and I was under that impression that EEO and the agency was taking corrective action, and they weren't. So when I hired an attorney, he suggested that I protect myself because he felt the disclosures were...that they were going to fire me, basically. They were going to try to find a way to fire me for the disclosures because they were serious enough. Thirty years of malpractice is pretty serious against the federal government, and he was right. MP: That was in the fall of '99? KS: That was '97. MP: '97? KS: Right. And then I filed in '99. **MP:** This in '99. KS: Correct. And then the investigation just started last year, which was 2002! Quite a distance of time! MP: And so, during that interim period, were they harassing you? KS: Oh, yes. MP: How did that manifest? KS: I think the easiest way to put it in a nutshell is, one of my managers — we'll put it that way — offered me \$20,000 to resign. I got 20 years, I need five years until retirement, and he thinks that I should take a resignation. Which is really, really out there. And, of course, he told me I'd never be meritly promoted. I just ruined my career by filing this. And I know that now. MP: And this sort of validation that comes from the special counsel doesn't help you out in the sense that they didn't suddenly see the light and a reward... KS: No! I'm a target, a big target! Oh, yeah. Oh, Lord, it's been horrible.

"The Office of Special Counsel is currently investigating charges of reprisal," is a better way of adequately putting it, which I don't think we're going to have a problem substantiating, but, anyhow, they are focusing on that now, and then second disclosures is right up on its heels for the destroyers, because they're going to have to fix the destroyers as well. Not just the aircraft carriers, but the destroyers, and not even all the carriers are on there. There's still a couple carriers that they have to go back and have corrected, the Kitty Hawk and such. MP: Who's behind this? Just a couple of guys?; I mean, how many people are in this conspiracy? KS: Oh, my goodness! There's like 20-something of them. I call it the mafia. What I find amazing with all of this is the people that are responsible, that were supposed to correct these problems or who I had gone through my chain of command to correct these problems, aren't the ones that are being reprimanded. They're pulling people that have never been involved with me or never been involved with anything to do with me that are close to retirement, "Oh, I'll take the hit, I'll take it." The next thing you know, they're given an oral admonishment; people are being given oral admonishments who had nothing even to do with my case. So I feel it's impeding with the federal investigation and that they need to stop these people, and the people that are in my

that should've corrected this 20 years ago should be held accountable. I don't understand what seems to be the problem with the agency doing this.

None of the commanding officers have been reprimanded to my knowledge. There was one quality assurance officer that was due to retire and agreed, according to what I've read, to take the fallout for quality assurance because he was due to retire, and all he was given was an oral admonishment.

There's been several managers involved that were never reprimanded, at all. Nothing at all. It's pretty amazing. I think Elaine Kaplan requested...to see if the disciplinary action was dealt out fairly. Because both of us know it wasn't. If you're reprimanding people that

had no involvement on it, what about the people that were involved? According to what I read from the agency, they're claiming it would've destroyed the managers' careers if they were reprimanded. Well, first of all, what about me? Second of all, what about the people that've been injured? I think that at least they should've been given the minimal amount of beach time. If you look on the Office of Special Counsel website, you'll see where just recently there was a case through Office of Special Counsel where some [Navy Investigative Service] agents used the vehicles inappropriately for personal use. That manager received 30 or 31 days on the beach. I have one manager out of a group of 20 that received three

days. So, if you're look-

ing at that, and the agency's saying disciplinary action was appropriate, I don't understand how they come to that reason, something as serious as what I've revealed to

them.

MP: Is this out of the ordinary just for this area, or does this go on all over the Navy? **KS:** You know, this base is the only base I've ever seen it like this. It's like working for the mafia. It truly, truly is. Like my attorney said, you offend one manager, and you seem to offend all of them. They've lost focus of what the whole issue of the complaint is about. My managers have taken it personal, like I was trying to personally attack them. That's totally untrue. They asked me to find a problem, I found the problem. But when they found out that they were responsible for the problem and that they would be liable, things changed. It was to the point where they were attacking me, trying to get rid of me. And I had no idea until just recently how bad it was. I had no idea that they had no valid NDI program or no valid QA program for 30 years. They're gonna have to answer to the Navy for that.

MP: And they've been around for a long time? KS: Oh, yes! I don't know how long Voyage Repair Team — I believe 30 years, 32 years. MP: Still working in the same place?

KS: Yeah, for the same agency.

MP: As far as the brass go, you mentioned that there's a captain. Who supervises these guys? KS: Admiral. MP: They report directly to an admiral? KS: Yes. A NAVAIR admiral. MP: Has the admiral been aware of any of this? Has he done anything about it? KS: You know, a lot of the stuff that I know is

mostly hearsay from command evaluation. They claimed to me that the captain [would] support me and that the admiral [would] support me. I haven't seen anything in writing from these people that states that. My attorney had to push to even acknowledge my Public Service Award. And I'm watching the people that should be held accountable for like, we have a welding engineer task force. We have people that are responsible to ensure that all the welding's done correctly and all that. These people should have been reprimanded for not having a valid program. But, in turn, they've been turned

around and given thousands of dollars for fixing a problem they never had for 30 years and no disciplinary action was taken against them. So it's like, people are being given promotions and awards for correcting problems that I brought up now, which has been in the system for 30 years. And these people have been there for 30 years. I don't understand why they're being awarded. It just amazes me. **MP:** And that's coming from the officer level? KS: Captain, yeah. And here I haven't received a dime, not one single penny. And I'm watching all these people that should have been held accountable in quality


assurance and welding and everything else. All of them are getting cash award after cash award, promotion after promotion. And it's kind of insulting. It's really insulting for me.

I've worked at many, many different bases and this one is truly unbelievable. The way that the workers look at it myself especially, my coworkers — we're not there to kiss people's feet. We're there to do a job to the best of our ability with the equipment that we have. That's not management's focus at North Island, which really surprised me. Coming from a nuclear submarine, their focus is workload. Getting the

submarine out under cost in a certain time for defense warfare. This base seems to be, like, "This is the person you need to please. Please, please, please people." They could care less about workload. And it really amazes me that there's more focus on power. There's a power-control struggle going there with certain managers and I think a lot of it has to do with the new implementation of senior executive systems for the federal government now. It's a new initiative that Bush put out to promote upper management. Basically these managers get really high in the chain and then they supervise

out contractors.

So there's a structural power trip going on there and it's just unfortunate that the workers are kind of falling in the struggle. MP: How does that struggle affect the workers? KS: It does a lot because, you know, they have to be able to establish that they can save money on the floors, so a lot of time if we are asking for specific equipment, or training, that they show cost savings if they don't have a certain amount of money per year savings, so they will eliminate buying stuff, and it does affect people on the floor because if you don't have this equipment to work with, you know, it's a little hard. When you're working with a welding machine that's 30 years old, that's pretty bad. I mean, I can't even get a hoist on line. Because they don't want to spend the money to have the hook certified. So in the meantime, people are having to heft things up, and I don't see...I guess they figure they save money by not having to pay for the training, not having to pay for the inspections, not having to keep it certified. It's all about a money thing, and that base is so small. MP: This goes back to the bidding against the private contractors? KS: Exactly. Somebody

comes in...like, one of the squadrons, "We need to have these repairs done," and then they'll open bid and whoever's the lowest gets it. And the federal government has a high hourly wage. I think we run at about \$117 an hour where private industry runs about \$54. **MP:** This issue is more recent than, say, '97 to '99?

KS: Well, actually, I think that's what started in — I think it was late '90s when Clinton and those guys were in office they started this. MP: Who are these contractors? Are these local folks? Are they like Halliburton? KS: Like Naasco, Continental, Maritime. Naasco's actually gotten huge. It used to be small in the early '80s. Now you'll see them everywhere. They even

have a whole dry dock at Bremerton now, which they never used to, but they were given a multimillion-dollar contract with the federal government, I believe, last year. For just San Diego, I think, it was, like, a \$20 million contract. That's quite extensive. So, federal government's trying to compete with them and it's kind of hard. MP: And so they're doing some of the work out there now? KS: Oh, they're doing a lot of the work. I mean, it's not uncommon to see Naasco all over the ships. A lot of times when we come on the ship, Voyage Repair Team, a lot of the military guys think we're contractors because they're so used to seeing the contractors on the ship that they don't realize that we're federal government.

MP: In one of your more recent communications, you sort of alluded to the fact that command changes a lot at North Island, so that the actual brass doesn't really play that much of a role. I think, as I recall, you said something about you talked to one of the supervisors, and they said, "Well, that captain's going to be gone." KS: There was a manager that threatened me, point blank. You see [Captain James Woolway] has been trying to correct the problems when he came in as an executive officer, now he's commanding officer. The federal government structures change because of the low number of enlistment and stuff now. They change. Instead of a commanding officer being in charge for two

or three years, now they're only in charge for 18 months at a time.... And [the manager] basically told me after [Woolway's] gone, he's coming after me....

[A North Island manager] told the Office of Special Counsel that I was a disgruntled worker, so what they did was shut my case down, originally. And then I had to appeal it and provide documents showing I was telling the truth. Of course, now in hindsight later, they're looking in going, "Oh my God, she did tell us before these sailors got hurt. We should've listened to her instead of taking his word for it and shut it down." He had no documentation to show that I was a disgruntled worker. I've never been wrote up in my life, so why did they take his

word for it? Well, he's a manager. That's a problem that I noticed at North Island; they do not listen to their workers at all. **MP:** There is an adversarial thing even with


this OSC procedure, right? Because obviously, when they responded to the OSC investigation, they sort of went down a checklist, and they attempted to debunk some of the stuff you've said. KS: Oh, they tried. From what I understand, too, Office of Special Counsel has been doing a very outstanding job, but I think the main thing that people have to understand...the main thing is to protect the liability of the Navy. All the way around. Of course, I don't think there's anybody that really wants to say, "Oh,

goodness gracious, we've been allowing this agency to commit intentional malpractice for 30 years, getting people hurt, especially sailors." At this time in war, I don't think they really want to admit that, but, unfortunately, that's what it all boils down to. And now how they correct it is another issue. MP: So where are we now? That brings us to what's going to happen in the future. KS: They're doing an audit right now. The audit is going to be completing, actually, at the end of this week from what I understand. Basically going

through all of my issues again as far as quality assurance. I guess quality assurance isn't doing too well. And welders are back on track; they're being required to do a lot of extra work







that they've never been able to have to perform before so the welders just absolutely hate me. MP: When you say extra, you mean more training and more... KS: Paperwork. You know, documenting what they're working on. Making sure they're welding it properly, doing all the required testing that they never used to do. They used to cut. They never used to do hydros and stuff, and now they're requiring them to do hydros. MP: And what's a hydro? KS: A pressurized test where they actually pressurize the piping system that they're welding to make sure that... Steam, water or oil, it doesn't matter. But they're testing it to make sure that it doesn't leak or that it could cause a fatality. **MP:** And they never did that before? KS: Never. And that's where a lot of my problems were because they were having me working on steam lines and such that were shooting airplanes off. You know, these are highpressurized items that they claim never were high pressure. That's a bold-faced lie. They weren't doing the precautionaries that they were required to. You know, the NDIs and stuff like that will show defects. The welders aren't very happy about it, but... And they have to take testing that they never had to take before, which they should have been taking all along. MP: So in other words, you get negative feedback from that? KS: Oh, my goodness! I'm so well hated there, it's unbelievable. I'm surprised I'm even going to work every day. Especially now that the results have come out, it's even worse than it was beforehand. Be-

cause before it was so


quiet-quiet, because I never defend myself. I don't care what management has to say. They're the ones that lost focus as to what this is about. It wasn't filed to create problems for the agency like the management thinks it was. And it wasn't filed to prevent them from getting workload. It was filed to ensure that the military personnel that are living on these vessels don't get killed because of something stupid or not wanting to pay the money to do it properly. And that's what it boils down to, and, of course, management feels it's a personal attack to them. The only thing that I feel I'm personally attacking is the fact that they never, ever took care of the problem when I addressed it. They attacked me instead of

taking care of the problem, and they just lost focus and they're so used to being able to intimidate people in getting their way that's it's created a problem for them. MP: So they've increased that regimen of testing and reporting. Anything else? KS: Well they have audits that are going to have to be done yearly, which I totally agree with. **MP** This one that's coming out? KS: This one, and then from now on, all the NAVAIRs, including Jacksonville, because we're not the only facility that are in this bind. You've got Jacksonville, which is in Florida, and you've got Lakehurst, New Jersey. You've got bases all over the United States that are supposed to be complying with these requirements and I think 95 percent of the ones they checked were out of compliance. That's horrible results. I think the only ones that were really up to speed were, like, Puget Sound because, you know, we were on the same level. That was my sister base for Mare Island, so everything was done in accordance with the guidelines. Well, a lot of these little satellite places have been getting away with it for so many years and can't figure out why their defect rate's high. Now they're going to have to change that because the audits are going to be taking place, and it's not just Navy, it's Air Force, Army, Marines, all of them. MP: And when they audit, what do they audit, the welds? KS: Yeah, they're checking for weld certifications. There are certain documents that have to be done and they're looking to make sure that those are done properly, that they're using the right materials, that the testings are being done and that everything is recorded with the ships so the ships know what to look for. The testing, that's the main thing for me: hydros and inspections and quality assurance testings are being done. MP: So they check through all of the logs


and stuff and make sure that happened? **KS:** Correct. And make sure that everything matches the guidelines. **MP:** Anything else that's being done? Those are the two basic? **KS:** That, and I think that they also opened up a new disclosure, which we haven't talked to the Office of Special Counsel about yet. So they can go in and make all the repairs to the destroyers that have been taking place for 30 years illegally. So there's a lot of things that are still left to be done yet. But as far as the carriers, from what I understand, the carriers are slowly but surely being repaired as far as the piping goes, and training. MP: It's going to expand to the destroyers? KS: It expanded through there and contractors. All the contractors are being required to be certified as well now. I think there was quite a bit of layoffs on the contractor side too, unfortunately. MP: Issues with contrac-


tors not being certified? KS: Yes. MP: Where were you


reassigned to? **KS:** Well, I've been put into all kinds of shops! MP: You've been moved around all over? **KS:** They have, seems like purposely tried to move me around so that management can come back and say, "Oh, see, she's a problem, so we had to move her again. See, she's a problem wherever she goes." That's what they tried to do, but of course, now that I have an attorney, I've been able to stop that. But it doesn't mean they don't try! They do try! My career is cold turkey, straight. After five years, I'm going to have to leave. That's all there is to it. I'm going to have to do a deferred retirement and leave the agency. I have no choice. I'm being placed at no choice. This will never end. Once [Woolway's] gone, they're coming after me. There's not

I foresee exactly what one of the managers said, "You're going to fight your way back." They're going to fire me for dirty coveralls and let me fight my way back.

And there's no doubt in my mind that once OSC is out of the way, which is another six months or so, that they're coming after me full barrel. They figure they ain't got nothing to lose. "Let her fight it in court. It'll take too many years to get into court." And that's just the way that those managers are. That's the way they think. And that's probably what's going to happen. I'll get fired and have to fight my way back and get a measly retirement out of it after 20 years. They're attacking my witnesses now.

MP: In what sense? KS: Oh, just writing them up for crazy, trumped-up charges. One of the guys, Carlos, as a matter of fact, he was wrote up the day before he retired for speaking to the Office of Special Counsel. Three, four, five of my witnesses have been wrote up in the last couple weeks on these trumped-up charges. It's just totally ridiculous. They've just lost control. Management has lost control. From what I under-

From what I understand, the captain has directed them to stop and desist, but these managers are so ingrained, so used to being feared that I think they use the focus of, "We'd better leave her alone or it's really gonna get..." They've got stupid stamped on their forehead. They really truly do. Recently my plant

cussing me. Now, this particular person doesn't even know me. I have never met this man, and he was just viciously tearing me up one side and down the other side to the captain with personal opinions of me, but he's never met me. It's kind of hard, and I'm not at a level to defend myself. I'm in a shop welding while this is going on. They've got 16 or 17 people trying to cover up for an excuse to the captain, and here I'm never even asked if it's true or not.

I read an e-mail just recently from my third line.... Got [shocked] on a weld machine four times, and they haven't done any repairs, and I kept telling them it was the ground or the machine. "Oh, she doesn't know what she's talking

about." Well, now the fourth time, when they opened up the machine yesterday, they found out that they had hardwired 480! They're lucky I didn't get killed! Now they're going to have to go back to the captain and say, "She's right."And he's going to have to answer because originally when I got shocked it was two years ago. And here they're having me use this equipment every day, and I keep telling them there's a problem, and they have a hard time. What I get from my supervisors is that they've never dealt with a female before, but they treat me like I'm not supposed to know my trade. It is so insulting. Or if I do a repair on something, "Oh, I never thought of doing it that way. Oh, but you messed up doing it this way." And you have to

look at them. And I'm a metalsmith. I'm not going to do everything the same way as everybody else is.... I know my trade extremely well, and they just can't seem to understand that. Or accept it, for that matter. **MP:** You're saying it got to the point where people were getting beat up and stuff? KS: Yeah, there was a lot of threats.... Basically, what happens is the first line supervisors have certain employees that act like their bullies. If somebody's bringing up something like I brought up, usually what happens is they get their little pit bull, and that person makes life miserable for the person to the point where they'll ask to leave. Well, they weren't going to be able to push me out, so there's a few particular people that are set in each area, and

that will have the tendency because management can't cross over; management can only do so much. So they have other people pressure you. And what happened was, when they saw that I wasn't going to leave, and I was pushing the issue to corrections, other people started defending me, saying, "Kristin's telling the truth. Leave her alone." And the next thing you know, that person's beat up. And then another person would step in, "Back up off her, leave her alone." And then he would be threatened. It's gotten to the point where either you're on my side or management's side. And it's not a good spot to be on Kristin's side. Management's got more power, so...

MP: How do you deal with it? Do you have


any apprehensions when you go in there in terms of just your personal safety? KS: Oh, my goodness, it's horrible. Yeah. Oh, God, yes. I can't live in fear of what's going to take place. I do have a lot of hang-ups at my home, which has been going on since...oh, God, yes. I can usually tell when something's taken place at the agency that I'm not aware of because the hang-ups will accelerate. For instance, before the inspector general got here, I didn't know they were coming in until I got, like, 14 phone calls in one night. So, there's a point of contact I have at the agency, and I call them, and I ask them what the hell's going on. He's, like, "Well, the IG's going to be here tomorrow." "Well, how did you know?" That's


what he asked me. Well, 14 hang-ups last night is telling me that something's going on. Now, that could only be coming out of management because they're the only ones that know in advance when certain people are going to be here because I was never notified until last minute. I think they told me 48 hours before they showed up this time, and then all of a sudden wanted a trunkload of documents put down-to-scale to one document. They have a lot more notification than I do. They always let the agency know so they can cover up everything real quick, shred a lot of documents and whatever else. That's just normal for the federal government, unfortunately. Kind of like the movie Silkwood.

had a few years' enlisted time on an A team and be better grounded. This is usually true, but it means that now officers enter Special Forces in the grade of captain. Their first assignment is usually command of an A team, and usually they are the least experienced man on the team. This is not a good thing and is the subject of this week's column (see page 5).



Freud Spares Mom





Leaders Prefer Tourism and Junk Jobs

Thank you for a nice, long article about SDMRM's celebration of John D. Spreckels' vision for a greater San Diego ("140-Mile Mistake," "Events Highlight," April 24). The San Diego & Arizona Eastern Railway was built to exploit the commercial aspects of the port of San Diego and allow the area to have a solid economy of its own, rather than become a suburb of L.A. When the federal government took over the railroads during WWI, the SD&AE was the only railroad allowed to be completed, because of its importance to the military. There were years in which the railroad did not break even, partially because of the high maintenance costs of the 21 bridges and 17 tunnels in Carrizo Gorge, and partially because of San Diego's anti-heavy-industry attitude dating from the 1920s. This anti-business attitude is still evident by our leaders' preference for tourism and junk jobs, rather than good-paying, steady bluecollar jobs other than temporary construction work. Through service to Yuma and the East ended in 1983 with the burning of two bridges in the gorge, but freight service to Tijuana and Tecate has continued to this day, and the line is open as far as Tunnel 8 in the gorge.

In the last ten years, NAFTA and 9/11 have made this railroad economically viable. Now many shipments of hazardous material delivered by the Burlington Northern & Santa Fe Railway sit between Petco Park and the convention center for 12 or more hours every day, waiting for the 3-anda-half-hour window on the trolley line when they can be taken to San Ysidro and on to Baja. Reopening this line would allow these potential terrorist targets to come directly from the East

and from mainland Mexico via Calexico, to the maquiladoras in Tijuana and Tecate. Eventually, the port of Ensenada will take Pacific Rim container traffic that the port of San Diego could have had. SD&AE would also benefit from President Fox's proposed Ensenada-Tecate Railroad line.

Carrizo Gorge Railway of Lakeside is now working in the gorge, and hikers and bikers are warned not to trespass there as locomotives and cars are traveling into the south end of the gorge every day, including Saturdays and some Sundays. In addition to people being caught on a bridge or in a tunnel by a 125-ton locomotive, desiccated corpses are occasionally found of people who were injured or ran out of water.

In anticipation of tourist trains through the gorge, the Jacumba railroad depot is being restored by Carrizo Gorge Railway to serve as a ticket office, so the resurrection of Spreckels' "mistake" is not "a long way off." Eventually, it will be acknowledged that a railroad can move people and freight cheaper, with less use of fossil fuel, and less damage to the environment, than any other form of transportation. Highway, air, and water transportation are all heavily subsidized by the taxpayer, while freight railroads pay property taxes on their land, track, and buildings! (The SD&AE is owned by the quasi-governmental Metropolitan Transit Development Board, which leases the freight service to the San Diego & Imperial Valley Railroad on the coastal portion and to Carrizo Gorge Railway on the mountain and desert portions.) We don't need as many trucks on our inadequate highways when the railroad can move the same thing cheaper. I-8 is frequently unusable in the winter by high-profile vehicles, but the SD&AE crosses the summit 800 feet lower, so is not as affected by snow and high winds. The railroad line north is living on borrowed time, as the Del Mar bluffs are estimated to collapse from erosion within 20 years, so why depend on everything coming through L.A.? Remember the complaining when the northbound railroad line was out of service for a few months, and trucking from L.A. was increasing the price of many items?

Psychobabble Scars

I recognize that "Still Crazy After All These Years" (January 9) is an "old article" to you, but it is just now making the rounds of folks who are specifically interested in it.

I'm sorry. Loren Mosher is not, as he described himself, "a lapsed psychiatrist." He is just an elderly man who followed the dead-end streets and whom science, thus, left behind.

Recently, Mosher has achieved a new energy, as he has testified for and against legislation closely attached to the Church of Scientology. The cult opposes psychiatric treatment, following the delusion of their founder, L. Ron Hubbard, who believed mental illness a myth. Of course, many think L. Ron was nothing more than a hack science fiction writer who once said that if you wanted to make money, found a church. So, he did. Perhaps he saw psychiatry as a competition to his "e-meter," called "the way to happiness."

Mosher himself was not in his heyday a follower of L. Ron. In fact, he was a disciple of sociologist R.D. Laing. Laing once likened schizophrenia to a self-enlightened acid trip. It is not.

Schizophrenia is a neurobiological brain disorder as medical in nature as diabetes or Alzheimer's.

The following excerpt from Madness in the Streets: How Psychiatry and the Law Abandoned the Mentally Ill, by Rael Isaac and Virginia C. Armat, describes the failed experiment of Soteria House.

"Mosher presents the following staffer's report as typical of Soteria's approach. 'I had had three hours of sleep, and even that had been broken sleep. Sleeping

with and guarding Sara is not especially conducive to good resting. I was sleeping on the floor by the door so that I would waken if she tried to leave.... [At six] I got up and started to fix her breakfast. She was sitting at the table waiting more impatiently; she then urinated on the bench she was sitting on...I was tired, I was sad...it was Sara's 16th birthday, "sweet 16." It was Sara's special day to celebrate, and there sat Sara in Soteria, soiling herself, terrified of dying, of being alone, or being with people, of spiders, of noises, of being loved, of being unloved. Happy Birthday, Sara...it was so goddamned sad.' The staffer goes on to describe this incident (in which Sara goes on to suck at her keeper's breast) as "the kind of incident that makes our house a special and more-than-good place."

The sort of psychobabble that initiated places like Soteria House permeated our mental health system for years. We can see its visible scars every day on our street corners, in encampments under freeway overpasses, and in our headlines and jails.

It is time to retire this garbage — and sometimes, it is time for an old psychiatrist to retire.

North American Smoke Plants

Airi Ross, author of Smoke Plants of North America, was in her 50s before she began using smoke as "the delivery system" for the herbal remedies that have interested her since age 19. "I was living in Tahlequah, the center of the Cherokee nation in Oklahoma," she said by phone from her current home in Jerome, Arizona. "The Cherokees are, of course, renown herbalists with 5000 herbs in their repertoire of healing."

In the late 1960s, Ross spent two and a half years in India with the Peace Corps. She lived in a village about 100 miles north of Benares. That's where she first witnessed herbal remedies being

used effectively, she said. Ross grew up in Oklahoma, where both her parents were physicians who practiced Western

for herbal remedies (just in teas at first) distressing. "They were originally from the mountains of Tennessee, so folk medicine and folk healing were not strange concepts to them." Her interest in herbs increased in Hawaii, where she lived in the early 1970s. "When we went on walks, a friend from Sri Lanka mentored me on the plants around us." The education continued in Mexico, when she lived at the tip of Baja, in the early 1980s and again in the 1990s. "A friend there had an aunt who was a curandera" — herbal healer – "and whenever I had little health problems, the aunt would recommend an herb." When she moved to

Tahlequah in 2000, her health problems were large. Her nervous system "had collapsed." There were many reasons why, she said without giving details. "A Cherokee friend and I were taking a Cherokee history class, and at his house afterwards he would smoke a pipe of something. I have never been a smoker, but I was drawn to the pipe. He was a Vietnam vet who'd been exposed to Agent Orange and had posttraumatic stress disorder, and he had worked with a medicine man who'd helped him with his smoking mixtures." When Ross tried her friend's pipe, she experienced "almost immediate relief" from some



of her symptoms: "Nervous anxiety, anxiety attacks — they were gone, within seconds."

Skullcap and passion flower are two of the "nervine" class of plants Ross began to smoke during her "personal healing journey." The nervines helped a relative, too. "He was going through a difficult time with obsessiveness and suicidal thoughts, and was on heavy medications. When he visited me, I gave him some skullcap to smoke. 'This takes me back from the edge immediately,' he said. Herbs aren't the entire answer. You're going to have to support your nervous system

in other ways, but they can keep you from the brink." Ross likes to put fennel seeds in her smokes, because of their anise

aroma. "Some smoking herbs don't have medicinal properties; they're used for flavoring. I am focused on the medicine, but I think there's room for aesthetics. Deer's tongue is another aromatic that I discovered through the Cherokees; it's like vanilla."

We associate coughs with smoking

(tobacco, anyway), so it's counterintuitive to think that smoking anything could be a cough "cure." Ross agreed, but offered a story about an herb called mullein. "A chronic mold was causing people here [in Arizona] to have irritated lungs and coughs, and people just smoked a little mullein and their coughing spasms stopped. Their lungs were relieved. Mullein is soft and fluffy, a very friendly, nontoxic plant that has been used as a lung cleanser by almost all the indigenous tribes."

Lobelia is commonly sold as an ornamental, but Ross claimed that smoking its dried leaves and flowers may help people stop or reduce their tobacco addiction. "Just a pinch in a mix attaches to the same [brain] receptors as nicotine."

Similarly, people Ross has known with "heavy marijuanasmoking habits" substituted some of the nervines "and were able to move off it."

Those who try to quit either of these substances may miss the ritual. Ross pointed out that taking out the pipe and the little bag of herbs can provide it.

Ross strongly suggests that, with the help of field guides, people gather, rather than buy, at least a few of their smoking herbs. "Mullein grows just about everywhere," she said. "Manzanita, a basic smoke plant, with an astringent quality, can be gathered in San Diego. I have not been able to find good-quality passionflower, so I am growing that one myself. Your connection with the actual live plant is the basis of herbalism. It's part of the healing."

This weekend, in addition to her lecture, Ross will demonstrate preparing mullein for smoking. "I used to smoke dried mullein until my friend in Tahlequah learned from a medicine person that it's

better when it's cut while still almost green, like after two days. It helps moisten the whole mix and has a much gentler quality on the lungs."



sage-scrub and chaparral plant communities, are in flower this month through June. Chamise, also known as greasewood, readily sprouts from root crowns after fire. Much of the area between the Laguna Mountains and El Cajon, swept by the mammoth Laguna Fire of 1970, is now covered by chamise 4 to 8 feet high and buckwheat 2 to 3 feet high. The stems of both plants are tipped by clusters of small white or cream-colored flowers, fading to russet-brown by July. Near the coast look for flattop buckwheat, common on south-facing slopes. Here it shares space with other low-growing sage-scrub plants like black sage and California sagebrush.

Mule Deer by the dozens are roam ing throughout Cuyamaca Rancho State Park, where they are protected year round from hunting. Take an early-morning drive down Highway 79 through the park, and you'll likely spot them on or near the road. To really study them, you can position yourself — preferably in on the edge of any of the several large meadows accessible via park trails. Watch carefully — and also keep an eye cocked for predatory mountain lions, which in recent vears have been threatening humans as well as the deer.

Oleander, a consistent spring/summer bloomer widely planted in front and back yards throughout the county, is putting on a fine show in the medians of certain area thoroughfares and freeways, especially Interstate 5 in North County. Alternating white, pink, and red bands flash by the traveler, with an occasional splash of out-of-sequence color, perhaps a subtle attention-getter designed to keep sleepy drivers awake. Most gardeners are aware of oleander's toxic characteristics: all parts are poisonous if ingested.

Look for Black-Chinned Sparrow, Lawrence's goldfinch, mountain quail, lazuli bunting, and other birds when Audubon Society birders head to Noble Canyon, Saturday, May 31, 8 a.m. to noon.







"Nursery Rhymes and Tales" presented by Peter Allen of Parasol things, took on forms their readers could not have anticipated. And it is a story about the ways we look to great books and writers to help us make sense of our experience, about the power of literature to change — to save — our lives.

WHAT THE CRITICS SAY:

From Publishers Weekly: Four 20th-century writers whose work was steeped in their shared Catholic faith come together in this masterful interplay of biography and literary criticism. Elie, an editor at Farrar, Straus & Giroux, where three of the four writers published their work, lays open the lives and writings of the monk Thomas Merton, Catholic Worker founder Dorothy Day, and novelists Flannery O'Connor and Walker Percy. Drawing comparisons between their backgrounds, temperaments, circumstances, and words, he reveals "four like-minded writers" whose work took the shape of a movement. Though they produced no manifesto, Elie writes, they were unified as pilgrims moving toward the same destination while taking different paths. As they sought truth through their writing, he observes, they provided "patterns of experience" that future pilgrims could read into their lives. This volume (the title is taken from a short story of the same name by O'Connor) is an ambitious undertaking and one that could easily have become ponderous, but Elie's presentation of the material is engaging and thoughtful, inspiring reflection and further study. Beginning with four separate figures joined only by their Catholicism and their work as writers, he deftly connects them, using their correspondence, travels, places of residence, their religious experiences and their responses to the tumultuous events of their times. This thoroughly researched and well-sourced work deserves attention from students of history, literature, and religion, but it will be of special significance to Catholic readers interested in the expression of faith in the modern world.

The day we talked, Mr. Elie had spent the afternoon in conferences at his place of employment, Farrar, Straus & Giroux, Mr. Elie came to FS&G in 1993. His first job was as the assistant to editor in chief Jonathan Galassi, and now he himself is a senior editor.

The second of four children, Paul Elie was born in 1965 in Niskayuna, New York, and grew up in the next town over from Niskayuna, Latham. "We were raised," he told me, "a Catholic family in upstate New York. I went to a very good public high

school called Shaker High School. In a writing course in 11th grade, I read John McPhee and then Tom Wolfe and immediately connected good writing with this place - Farrar, Straus & Giroux. I picked up with another group of FS&G writers after I began college, which was at Fordham University in the Bronx. Fordham is a Jesuit university, and as a student there, I naturally sought to figure out the tradition in which I'd been raised. During the Christmas break of freshman year, I bought Flannery O'Connor's Complete Stories. At the time I thought Flannery O'Connor was a man."

The book of O'Connor's Complete Stories included an introduction by Robert Giroux - of Farrar, Straus & Giroux - in which Giroux compared O'Connor to Thomas Merton, saying they shared "a highly developed sense of comedy, deep faith, great intelligence."

So then," Mr. Elie said, "I went to Merton. There was a big shelf of Merton books on the top floor of the Fordham library, which resembled a church. I would go up there and find a churchy window and sit on the floor, Indian style - and that was how I read Merton's books.

Mr. Elie received his B.A. from Fordham in English and writing. After graduation he worked for a feature syndicate, United Features, where he had been employed, part-time, during college ("In some ways," he said, "I really learned how the language works from working as a copy editor there") and then to the MFA program at Columbia University to study the writing of fiction. "I wrote magazine pieces on the side and taught nonfiction writing to Columbia undergraduates and found that I was attracted to nonfiction writing more than fiction."

Spy, the satirical magazine, where Mr. Elie worked as a copy editor during graduate school, was another valuable experience, Mr. Elie said. "Spy — that was a true education — an opportunity to learn how the city works, and also how a magazine works. Spy was essentially a realistic magazine about how things worked. People always spoke of the meanness of Spy's satire, but it was essentially a realistic magazine, explaining how the culture business worked, breaking down the power structure into its nuts and bolts, in a way that is now commonplace.'

Lingua Franca, which closed down in 2001, was one of the magazines for which Mr. Elie wrote. He praised the magazine. "So often, if you're breaking in as a magazine writer you have to write the captions or whatever - 30 or 50 words, tops. At Lingua Franca,



relatively inexperienced writers were entrusted with 5000- and 6000-word feature articles, pieces with real arguments, with narrative arcs. It's no accident that so many writers who are now prominent got their start at *Lingua Franca*."

That kind of writing, while fulfilling, was hardly a living. "I was freelancing around, and it's just so difficult, the freelance life, especially come tax time. My father worked for the New York State Labor Department, and he always conveyed an appreciation of a good job. So when I had a

chance to go to work at FS&G as Jonathan Galassi's assistant, I grabbed it. That was ten years ago, and in some ways I've really been schooled here."

I asked Mr. Elie about 89-year-old Robert Giroux, the editor, first at Harcourt Brace and later at FS&G, of many of America's finest writers. Giroux, who graduated from Columbia University in 1934, edited Kerouac's first novel, *The Town and the City*, and rejected *On the Road* when Jack Kerouac refused to slice the roll of teletype paper on which it was written into individual pages. At Harcourt and at FS&G, Giroux edited Walker Percy, Flannery O'Connor, and Thomas Merton (who had known him at Columbia).

"He's an amazing man. He's utterly unpretentious. I had an office close to his when I first became an editor here, and since then we've had many lunches together. He and Roger Straus are formidable storytellers. Their stories come out so perfectly crafted and sparkling that you know they have been edited and perfected in the retelling.

"I might have expected so esteemed an editor to be endlessly correcting everybody. Mr. Giroux is not like that at all. Mr. Giroux is not the Maxwell Perkins–type editor who takes things apart and engages in radical reconstruction. Rather, he had and has a tremendous instinct for what's right about a book and what's not and for which writer in the pack has real depth. The same is true of Roger

How to judge what's a really good book, Mr. Elie said, is not often taught in universities. "You're taught how to interpret a text that is already acknowledged as important, but not how to judge a text on its own merits — how to exercise one's own judgment, deciding which work is a live one and which one less so. "

What distinguishes the books that FS&G has published — among them those by 20 Nobel laureates — from those published elsewhere?

Mr. Elie said FS&G books have in common "high seriousness, often a challenge to the reader, but always an essential clarity and integrity. The books that Robert Giroux has edited, at Harcourt Brace and at FS&G, have rarely had a self-conscious literary difficulty or obscurity about them. On some level they are all realistic books, conveying the writer's apprehension of an objective reality. Even the wildest of Robert Lowell's poems are attempts to order and make sense of the chaotic realities inside his head. It's the same with Kerouac — the elaborate style is an effort to capture the stream of reality in which he was moving, to be true to the restless and kinetic aspects of postwar American life. And with Bernard Malamud — the first thing you notice in *The Magic Barrel*, say, is Malamud's beautiful Yiddish-inflected idiom, but the next thing you notice is that in the opening of each story a character has been brought to life in a single sentence."

We talked, then, about Mr. Elie's book. I had bought his book for friends who celebrate April and May birthdays. Everyone I knew who was reading the book admired the way in which Mr. Elie, again and again, shifted his focus from one protagonist to the next. These readers admired, too, how well Mr. Elie evoked the historical periods in which his subjects lived, periods well before Mr. Elie's time. We thought that he did a particularly good job of explicating the changing role of the Roman Catholic Church in the American denominational scheme. We all had asked each other the same question, and it was the first question I asked Mr. Elie about his book. Of Mr. Elie's four subjects, only Flannery O'Connor was a so-called cradle Catholic, who was baptized into the faith as an infant. Merton, Dorothy Day, and Walker Percy were converts. What did Mr. Elie believe drew these three to the Church?

"The story of the book in some ways is the story of ideas in action. There are many things about the Catholic faith that those three found attractive, and perhaps the most important was that

Merton had his life laid out for him as a literary journalist, but he yearned for the total commitment to the encounter with the divine that he had read about in medieval philosophy. Percy, after reading Kierkegaard and Dostoevsky and Camus, took the classic exis-

Mr. Elie noted, too, that in years during and after World War II in the United States, Anglo-Catholic and Roman Catholic writers were prominent. People were reading T.S. Eliot, C.S. Lewis, Charles

Williams, Evelyn Waugh, G.K. Chesterton, Graham Greene, Léon Bloy, Paul Claudel, Charles Péguy, Georges Bernanos, Jacques Maritain, Étienne Gilson, and François Mauriac.

About this enthusiasm for Catholic writers, Mr. Elie said, "There's no question that was going on, and it plays a vital role in the story told in my book. Just before the war, the attraction to those writers had to do with a yearning for another, better world than the war-wracked modern one. As the Western world descended into war, an ideal realm became more and more attractive whether it was the idealized Anglo-Catholicism of T.S. Eliot or the idealized French Neo-Thomism of Étienne Gilson."

The Maritains were converts to Roman Catholicism — Jacques was a Protestant and Raissa was Jewish. As early as the 1930s Dorothy Day recommended Jacques Maritain's writing to Catholic Workers. The couple came to the States in 1941 and was lionized by Catholic and Protestant intellectuals. I said to Mr. Elie that dur-(continued on page 96)



ing the late 1940s and all through the 1950s, one invariably saw copies of Jacques Maritain's Art and Scholasticism and Gilson's Spirit of Medieval Philosophy on the bookshelves of American intellectuals. I asked why Mr. Elie thought that Americans were so taken with the Maritains and Gilson.

"A movement toward ressourcement, or 'recovery of the sources,' in the church, which those French thinkers led, urged theologians in particular to dig back in the tradition as far as possible, back past the Counter-Reformation to the Middle Ages and the patristic period. These thinkers weren't exactly encouraged to bring the tradition up to date - Rome resisted - but that's what happened. So you suddenly had very European figures, fluent in the past as few people in the tradition had been, whose work was taking root, for various reasons, in America and then finding its way into the pages of the Catholic Worker and books like The Seven Storey Mountain."

"What exactly was the appeal of philosophers like Maritain and Gilson — Catholic philosophers - to literary people like Thomas Merton?'

"I think it has to do again with the notion of ideas in action. They were philosophers who had open personal commitments ----who were committed to a way of life, represented by the Church, and not just to a system of thought set down in books for the benefit of other philosophers. I think Jacques and Raissa Maritain were openly chaste, isn't that right? They'd taken a vow to practice the asceticism they admired in the great medieval figures. And so, in other words, they were philosophers who had put their lives on the line in a way. The attraction Merton felt to them was not unlike the attraction he felt a generation later to Albert Camus, who was not merely a writer but a man of action, who sought to working in the Resistance, editing the journal Combat, etc."

I said how interesting I found it to think about what books were popular in what eras. Mr. Elie agreed, adding that

it was of interest "to consider, in every age, which past ages are in revival or which past milieus

are imaginative foils to the one at hand. At the same time [as the great interest in Catholic writers], for example, there was a very intense Henry James revival going on among American novelists and critics — and as it happened some critics conflated the Catholic revival and the James revival and tried to make a case for James as a crypto-Catholic."

Mr. Elie took care not to get mired in his subjects' childhoods. "When I read biographies - especially a literary biography," he said, "I almost always skip forward to adolescence, because while there are a few exceptions --- Virginia Woolf's it is when they began reading in earnest and writing in earnest that things really start happening for writers."

"One thing all four of your people had in common," I suggested, "was that they were moved more by the literature they read than, for instance, Bible stories or so-called 'religious books.' '

"I don't think there's any question but that's true," said Mr. Elie. "Maybe it hasn't been stressed enough how important books were to them. There are a number of instances in which figures in the book read a book and set out to do what's done in the book, as if a novel or a biography were a guidebook. Merton is reading the life of Gerard Manley Hopkins; Hopkins decides to become a Catholic: Merton decides to become a Catholic."

"And what," I said, "if Hopkins had joined the circus?"

"Exactly — the question opens up the great and mysterious question of how it is that we model our lives on those of others, or on lives we read about in books. There's a famous incident, dramatized in the book, in which Merton, while a student at Columbia, happens to be on Fifth Avenue and happens

to spot The Spirit of Medieval Philosophy in the window of the flagship Scribner's bookshop. And if Charles Scribner & Sons hadn't published the book, it probably wouldn't have been in the window of the bookshop it was, after all, a translated volume of lectures on medieval philosophy. And what if Merton had had a track meet [at Columbia] that day and had never happened on the book? His life, and the life of Catholic writing in this country, might have been altogether different. It's amazing to think what a turning point seeing that book in the window was - for him, and perhaps for us.

The process repeated itself. in effect, when Flannery O'Connor came to New York with Robert Lowell — where they were fellows together — and went along with him to Robert Giroux's office. She was on the outs with the person who was supposed to be publishing her first book, Wise Blood. She was only 23, but her self-possession was complete. That day in his office, Giroux gave her a copy of The Seven Storey Mountain, which he had just published, and the book let her know that there was somebody in New York who would understand Wise Blood as an essentially religious book. Publishers hand books to prospective authors all the time. But that was like a secret handshake, almost; the passing of that book passed from him to her that day. It said, 'I'll understand your work, keep going along the strange line of prophecy that you're taking."

In The Life You Save May Be Your Own, Mr. Elie writes about what he calls "wisdom literature." I asked how he defined that term.

"I think of it as work that we read with our whole lives. Not simply with whatever part of ourselves is reserved for aesthetic appreciation, or what Eliot called 'superior amusement,' or delight. It's when we bring our whole selves to the book and feel our whole selves engaged with it. There's plenty of wisdom literature that doesn't necessarily engage each of us individually as wisdom literature. Every book doesn't work for every person. But I think we all have certain books that have reached us in that way.

"All four were great readers before they were great writers," Mr. Elie writes about his subjects. I mentioned that all four of his protagonists, at least

in his portraval of them, seem at their happiest when they were reading. I asked Mr. Elie about that.

"That seems exactly right, though I hadn't thought of it. Dorothy Day read her way out of depression at least twice; when she met certain people who were in low spirits, she would urge them to read a great 19th-century novel. Merton was an obsessive reader — as a Trappist, he had books sent to the Abbey of Gethsemani from monasteries and libraries all over the world. Walker Percy described his time as a tuberculosis patient in the sanitarium as a time when he did nothing but read and think. 'I was the happiest man ever to contract tuberculosis,' he said. He makes a few months in quarantine sound pretty good.³

Merton's Seven Storey Mountain was published in 1948. I asked Mr. Elie about the book's influence on its readers. He reminded me that the

book, given its strong sales, should have been on the New York Times bestseller list. But it was not on that list because the Times refused to list it, calling it a religious book. "Robert Giroux told me," said Mr. Elie, "that the book sold 600,000 copies but the Times still wouldn't put it on the list." As to why the book was so

popular, Mr. Elie said, "The common line of thought is that Catholics had just come of age, that the immigrant generations had been educated.

"And," I said, "these same generations had just come home from World War II."

'Yes, and the experience of fighting for their country had shown them to be real Americans and not people loval to Rome above Washington. I think that's true, but not the whole story, and again and again in writing my book I became convinced that the reasons for a book's success were finally artistic and not social. Why was The

Seven Storey Mountain such a success? Because it is the first book that I know of in American Catholic writing that is really about religious experience, about what it feels like to have the Hound of Heaven on one's heels, to have a yearning for firsthand experience of the divine and go after it. It's not about how the church is structured or how one is supposed to behave.

'There's a lot of what almost might be called Whitmanesque self-regard in the book, a very American sense of the self, but one that is beautifully married to the French Catholic tradition. The result is a satisfying book in which many people were able to put themselves in Merton's place; many then went to the monastery, seeking to become monks because they'd read a book by a man in his early 30s who was confident that his monastery was 'the center of America.' Amazing.'

We talked, more then, about Merton and his book's influence. Mr. Elie offered this. "When I have a meal with Mr. Giroux, there's a word that invariably comes up, a word that is common in the literature of the period in which he was a young man and not so common now. It's the word 'phony.' Merton, Kerouac, Salinger, and plenty of others used it. All through their work, somebody is saying, 'So-and-so is a phony, he's a real phony. I'm not sure why, but the obsession with whether somebody or something is authentic or phony was in the air then. Merton gave it a religious dimension. The Seven Storey Mountain made monastic life seem like 'real life' and made modern life in New York City seem phony in comparison. In retrospect, even Merton granted that his gripe against modernity was too harsh, but when you're in the middle of the book, you find yourself saving, 'He is right. The modern world really is alienated from its ultimate purpose,' and so forth.

"Ionathan Galassi likes to say that a good book has many different points of entry. So it was with The Seven Storev Mountain. It has monasticism, it has the life of a young writer; it's about an orphan, it's about a guy whose friends become his family at college, it's about what it's like to have a mentor like Mark Van Doren, and it's about the coming of war. All those things and many more."

Doren Mark . Van (1894-1972) taught in the English department at Columbia University for 39 years - from 1920 to 1959. Merton was a Van Doren student, as were John Berryman, Kerouac, Dan Wakefield, Stanley Kubrick, Louis Simpson, Allen Ginsberg, Lawrence Ferlinghetti, Donald Keene, Clifton Fadiman, and Robert Giroux. As Mr. Elie notes in The Life You Save, Merton "cast Van Doren as Virgil in The Seven Storey Mountain, and Merton's sketch of him is an outline of his own ideal literary figure.'

I said to Mr. Elie that Van Doren was extraordinarily influential on his students.

Mr. Elie suggested that there



exists among students "a felt need for a guide figure, and Van Doren was a kind of guide to those students, a Virgil to them. His aim was to show them how to read and think for themselves, but his concern lent a kind of authority to their inquiries."


A couple who was important to Flannery O'Connor were the Fitzgeralds - Robert and Sally. Married in 1947, Robert and Sally met during World War II when both were serving in the Navy, and Sally converted to Catholicism upon marrying Robert, a devout Catholic. Among their friends was Robert Lowell, a Catholic convert. Lowell introduced O'Connor to the Fitzgeralds. The friendship blossomed. O'Connor would end up being godmother to one of the Fitzgeralds' six children, and Robert and Sally Fitzgerald, after O'Connor's death in 1964, when she was 39, would become editors of her prose and her letters.


Mr. Elie reminded me that much of what we know about Flannery O'Connor is owed to Sally Fitzgerald, who put together her letters. O'Connor was an enthusiastic correspondent who not only saved letters she received. but she made carbon copies of the letters she sent out.


About O'Connor's habit of making carbons, Mr. Elie said, "I'm not sure why, but it seems to me that few scholars frankly acknowledge that O'Connor was writing for posterity when she wrote those letters. Of course, she was writing each letter to the person who was the actual recipient. But in the book I try to dramatize that they're written, really, for us. She knew she wasn't going to be around forever and that she would have to explain herself, and she didn't miss a chance to put her point of view out there." I confessed that I had imag-

ined that Flannery O'Connor was one of those people who, after she mailed off a letter, read and reread the carbon copy of that letter.

"I think that's right. And there are several instances in the book in which she refers back to an earlier letter. She's writing not to one of her regular correspondents but to somebody who's a reader, who's written her a letter. She makes a somewhat disingenuous remark, something like, 'I was going through some old papers, and I happened upon a carbon which I keep for various purposes.' She was trying to backhandedly explain why she had a copy of the letter without making it too obvious that she was keeping a big stack of her correspondence.

"I think she liked to read herself," I said, "that she liked to read what she'd written."

"Exactly. I depict her as a character type I call 'the independent,' and what strikes us about this kind of person is the self-sufficiency of his or her vision. Of course, O'Connor read widely, and I make a big point of trying to show the influences upon her. But there is a sense in which she sees things her own way and feels her vision of the world to be unique. And given that, yes, she took a lot of pleasure in her own vision. She said she laughed at her own stories as though someone else had written them. She laughed at her own jokes when she read them aloud."

I wondered what Mr. Elie had done with his research materials for *The Life You Save May Be Your Own.* "I imagine you," I said, "as having boxes and boxes and boxes of files and Xerox copies of letters and photographs."

"I do, but I've put them into a Manhattan mini-storage. This is a long book, and obviously there was a lot of research involved, but it seems to me that too many writers do all the research first and have run out of gas by the time they sit down to write. It's a book about reading, so I didn't put everything on note cards. Rather, I filled the margins of books with observations, and I read the books over and over. Each time I had a new section of O'Connor to do, I'd break out the O'Connor books and read the relevant stuff - at lightning speed, often. And then I would get busy writing. That going back to the books again and again gave me such a charge; I came to feel such intimacy with these writers through their books."

Walker Percy is best known for his novels — The Moviegoer, The Last Gentleman, Love in the Ruins: The Adventures of a Bad Catholic at a Time Near the End of the World, Lancelot, The Second Coming, and The Thanatos Syndrome. But he also wrote essays that initially were printed in journals and magazines and later collected in books. I confessed to Mr. Elie that I had tried, tried hard, to read these essays, but that I found them rough going, and I found them boring. Mr. Elie admits that he struggled with some of Percy's essays, those on semiotics in particular. I told him how much I appreciated his admission.

"It's important to acknowledge what doesn't work," he said. "I think that a lot of people writing this sort of book feel an obligation to sell the writer to the public, instead of just taking the material straight and responding to it honestly as a reader."

"I get the feeling," I said, "that he was filling time, writing those essays."

Mr. Elie didn't disagree. "I say at one point in the book that he solved his intellectual problems by writing about them. A lot of his essays, even if we're not drawn to them, were necessary. He had to answer certain questions in his mind in order to move on to more accessible work."

"Also," I said, "I think that Percy was deeply interested in what I think of as 'C.P. Snow' science and religion, science and culture or art questions." "I think that's right and

"I think that's right and that he felt his own life to be bifurcated. Certainly the distinction between science and art was in play then and is less important now. "

I asked about Mr. Elie's use of the word "pilgrimage" in his subtitle.

"A 'pilgrimage,'" he said, "is a journey undertaken in the light of the story. The story precedes us. We really come to life in the middle of stories that aren't ours. They're either our family's, or those of our region or cultural tradition, or those of certain writers. And then we want to test those stories and check them out for ourselves. But we don't simply want to walk in the footsteps of another. We want to see for ourselves or have the experience for ourselves and somehow to make it our own.

"I suggest at one point in the book that you could almost interpret American Catholicism as what Harold Bloom would call 'a creative misreading of Catholic Europe.' But certainly here were people, three of them converts, Americans, who sought to take aspects of the Catholic story and make it their own, to claim it as much as to be claimed by it — to take possession of it and feel that it was really their story. That's where the pilgrimage is, and it's not true of all writers, but it is definitely true of these four.

"Each of the four," I said, "is conscious of writing himself or herself into the story."

"I think that's right, in that they saw themselves as representative figures. There's a certain amount of ego that's required to do that. And they all had it."

"Walker Percy had it the ego—least of all, perhaps."

"I think that is true," Mr. Elie said, "but he also in some ways probably needed it least, in that he was accustomed to a certain amount of attention as a member of an important family."

We talked about several generations of troubled American poets — Delmore Schwartz, Randall Jarrell, John Berryman, Robert Lowell, Anne Sexton, Sylvia Plath. Our discussion led Mr. Elie to say, "I feel better about the present age in literature than a lot of people do. I think that great artists are always the exception and that it's hard to see the exception. As I point out in the prologue to my book, right at the moment when these writers were emerging, Lionel Trilling was complaining that there were no representative figures in American letters. They were all around him; he was either looking in the wrong place or had a fixed idea of what such a person would look like, an ideal that these people didn't match. "Let's say that you go along

with the notion of pilgrimage that I put forth in the book. It means that the pilgrim has a tremendous regard for the past, and the past can be intimidating. I think there are many writers in every age who aren't able to work past just their admiration for their predecessors who think, 'It'll never be as good as it was then.'

"Merton especially thought that way for many years. Not in the 1960s, but earlier, he would read a book about the Middle Ages or the Renaissance, and he would think, 'Ah, that was the time to be alive.' Now it's his life that looks good."

The average book has about 100,000 words. How many words were in *The Life You Save May Be Your Own*?

"This," Mr. Elie said, "is 220,000, plus notes."

We talked about the notes, which not only recognize the materials used by the author, but often explicate this or that abstruse point. Everyone I knew who was reading Mr. Elie's book, including me, enjoyed the notes.

That section, Mr. Elie said, "is quite long because I wanted to give acknowledgment of how much I owed to other books. I didn't think that interviewing old classmates was the way to go with these writers. I was after something else. I was trying to figure out what it is in their work that is so captivating, and I'm not sure that any reminiscence could explain that. So I made it a book about reading and writing — and wound up writing 25,000 words of notes."

Mr. Elie said that he wrote the notes "at a time of great distress. My wife was on bed rest at St. Vincent's Hospital before giving birth to our twin boys. I would ride my bicycle home from the hospital at 10:00 at night, when visiting hours ended and I was forced to leave and go home and work on the notes until 1:00 a.m."

He finished the notes on September 13, the day his twin sons were born. He handed the notes in at 2:00 in the afternoon, and the twins were born at 9:00 in the evening.

He was happy, Mr. Elie allowed, about becoming a parent and about the book. "I feel so fortunate. To write any book, the writer has to be lucky. I was lucky in so many ways. I had good health and time to work and was catching breaks all over the place. I'd notice something in my reading that would serve as a piece of joinery between the stories of two of my subjects. Often, I would have an exhilarating sense of being on to something. Most of all, I'd never really understood the power of a story before. But the story was there waiting for me at many points. I didn't have to force it.

A Marriage Not Made in Heaven

had long anticipated cellist Gary Hoffman's recital in the La Jolla Music Society's "Revelle" series — the more so when I found out that the program would consist of all five of the Beethoven Cello and Piano Sonatas. These

works span the composer's career in an exceptionally interesting way. The first two are early works, from 1796, full of invention and exuberance. The

third, first performed in 1809, shows Beethoven at the height of his revolutionary, brilliantly self-confident middle period. The final pair (1815) are far more inward and searching, in form and content, already exhibiting the profound and often puzzling traits of "late" Beethoven. Through this intermittent series, moreover, Beethoven seems to be working out a number of similar ideas, related to his concept of the cello's voice and expressive possibilities, and to his efforts to find an effective balance between the cello and the keyboard instrument.

Consequently, hearing all five sonatas on a single program, arranged chronologically, has a special impact; it can provide remarkable insights into the unique arc of Beethoven's creative career. The numerous complete recordings of the Cello Sonatas make it possible to listen to them in this way at home. But, to my knowledge, no one had offered such a program in San Diego's concert halls. I was particularly happy that Hoffman had chosen to do so, since in an earlier review I had lamented the fact that no recordings of his Beethoven existed. Here, finally, was the opportunity to hear one of our greatest cellists play Beethoven, in person — and the full montv!

Alas, things did not work out as I had hoped. The problem is that the Beethoven Cello Sonatas are not just for cello, but also and not in a subsidiary way - for piano. A more equal distribution of responsibilities

could not be asked for. Not only is the piano

anist of equal stature, and above all — two musicians JONATHAN SAVILLE whose interpretive instincts are very much alike. At Sherwood

Auditorium, Hoffman was paired with André-Michel Schub, and it was not a successful marriage.

Schub is a pianist of authentic competence. He is intelligent and tasteful. We have heard him, over the years, participating in numerous excellent chamber music performances. On this Beethoven program, there were no overt conflicts with Hoffman; presumably, they had rehearsed together, and had come to an agreement on basic interpretive matters. Nor could one say that Schub did anything explicitly wrong. There were no big mistakes, no eccentricities, no gross failures of judgment. His playing was careful, assiduous, and decent. But Schub and Garv Hoffman were in different worlds.

I have heard Hoffman performing with other pianists. In 1991, he played at Sherwood with the late David Golub in a program of Mendelssohn, Chopin, and Fauré sonatas; in 1995, the two musicians offered the Brahms F Major Sonata at a SummerFest concert: and they recorded the Debussy Sonata together. In 2001, Hoffman gave a recital here with Philippe Bianconi, which included the Shostakovich and Grieg Sonatas and Janácek's Pohádka; Hoffman and Bianconi have recorded the Shostakovich, along with the Prokofiev Sonata.

Golub and Bianconi are very different pianists, each with his own distinctive sound, style, and temperament. Yet in their performances with Hoffman each provided an exciting and harmonious counterpoise to the

cellist's ardent, intensely expressive, and beautifully shaped playing. They reflected Hoffman's manner and they influenced it. There was, in these collaborations, a sense of mutuality, in which the individual characteristics of the cellist and the pianist were at once affirmed and transcended.

But with Schub, a listener was conscious of a deep-seated friction between the two artists. It was not a conflict of personal character or of interpretive theories, but a dissension between the essential musical personalities of the two musicians, at a level where no amount of amiable discussion can change things. In other contexts, Schub has sounded more or less at home, doing all the right things according to his own instincts, and fitting in nicely. But in the atmosphere of feeling and meaning radiated by Hoffman, he sounded stiff, wooden, external, shallow, hasty, and lacking in nu-

Gary Hoffman, cello; André-Michel Schub, piano ance. When in Beethoven, Complete Sonatas for Piano and Cello Hoffman's playing one heard passion or playfulness, in Schub's one heard a mechanical

imitation of strong feeling or a routine attempt at lightness. When each of the musicians repeated the same phrase, Hoffman's was vibrant with life and Schub's was — by comparison inert. The disaccord between the two made the music painful to listen to; and even Hoffman seemed to be dragged down by it. Moreover, Schub played too loudly (the lid was at full stick) and too percussively. I found the experience intolerable.


If you want to hear what Beethoven's music for cello and piano sounds like when the performers are on each other's wavelengths, you ought to listen to the recordings by Jacqueline du Pré and the young Daniel Barenboim, Heinrich Schiff and Till Fellner, Pierre Fournier and

Wilhelm Kempff, Mischa Maisky and Martha Argerich, Antonio Janigro and Jörg Demus, Guido Schiefen and Alfredo Perl, Mstislav Rostropovich and Sviatoslav Richter, or (in performances with fortepiano that may approximate what Beethoven's audiences actually heard) Anner Bylsma and Jos van Immerseel. I have not listed these in order of preference. They are all quite different from each other, with Maisky-Argerich and Bylsma-van Immerseel at the interpretive extremes and the others in between. But all the recordings I've mentioned allow one to appreciate the individual sonatas and to follow the composer's development, without being distracted by problems of performance like those that were so evident at Sherwood.







he cast list for Asian American Repertory Theatre's *Fentor* includes Thomas Villegas, as the Beanbag; William Henry, as the Chair; and Michelle Wong, as the Table. Now I don't know where Villegas studied, but Beanbag?

Yup. And he plays it as a sprawling Buddha who hasn't missed a meal since his Bo Tree days. Henry's stiff-backed "chair"

scolds like a priggish schoolmarm. Wong's Table comes in later. She teaches the Beanbag and Chair how to walk. And, in Jason Fong's drama, the three teach young Fentor, symbolically, how to get back on his feet.

Since his mother died, 1147 days ago, Fentor shut himself down. He prefers an inner world where furniture talks, pain's absent, and his mother's spirit can appear — to the one outside. When he strays, Fentor gets so lost in the real world that his family parades with pots and pans to find him.

In one of his books — I think it's *Childhood* and Society, but don't quote me — Erik Erickson writes about the "microsphere." Children invent a village or an island. At the end of the day, the child has a toy hero go around the island righting wrongs. When the hero has solved all the problems in this "little world," he goes to sleep. And the child, having resolved real-life difficulties in miniature, can rest as well.

Erickson never wrote about adult microspheres, though Shakespeare's control of Prospero's island fits the model. And how many people use athletic teams as little worlds, only to find their problems not assuaged but *enhanced* by the identification?

Fentor's so hurt his microsphere is macro-, an entire room, and not always an ally. And to the playwright's credit, acceptance of loss doesn't come easily in the hour-long drama. In fact, at various stages, odds argue against it.

Fentor isn't the only griever. His father — patient, compassionate Gary Chun — brother (Jason Hwang), and sister (Jolene Hui) become torn between their own hurt and their younger brother's disturbing isolation.

Fentor unfolds like improv sketches, short bits

and blackouts, and shifts from past to present. The Asian American Rep's spare production uses a short black platform, white rear screen, and black curtains on the side. An uncredited lighting design turns this Kansas into an Oz of bright

effects. The show could use tightening — minimalism works best in both space *and* time — but has a quiet charm. Director Andy Lowe uses

the entire space, before and behind the audience, and what a space it is! Part of the City Heights Urban Village Performance Annex, it's a glorious black-box theater, intimate, with variable seating, sophisticated lighting equipment, and hundreds of possible configurations. The only thing wrong: although the space has been in existence for some time, the paint and seats smell brand new. They shouldn't. This wonderful site doesn't just beg for use, it screams to be *worn out* by challenging theatrical endeavors.

The Fern Street Circus has become a San Diego institution. Grassroots, it showcases homegrown tumblers, jugglers, gymnasts, clowns, and intrepid aerialists performing high-wire Terpsichore. Fern Street has institutions within the institution. A show wouldn't be complete without the always-funny Memo Mendez as Ringmaster. This year he's dressed not like a lounge lizard, but a lounge tiger from "the planet Pamplona." Red and black stripes adorn his smoking jacket, from which dips a devilish, spearpointed tail. And when he coaxes applause from the audience, Mendez does it in two — or is it three? — languages: "*damas y caballeros*, give it up, y'all!"

Mendez beckons the Mother Ship to land for the "first ever intergalactic invitational variety arts festival." And performers from all over the universe spill onto Fern Street's blue center ring. A flying saucer spins through this "costume moment" — another Fern Street institution. Over the years Judy Watson and now Randal Sumabat have designed some of San Diego's most rambunctious outfits. This year's hyperspace neon colors and ersatz geometrical shapes are so eye-catching it's easy to overlook



their essential, aerobic utility. The Melody Makers, one of the best backup bands around (and another Fern Street institution), wear aqua, scarlet, and saffron uniforms that could gain them admission into Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts clubhouse.

The talent is stronger than ever. I can remember when acrobat Corky Lindsey used to make a running leap over five people stretched out on a tumbling mat and wowed everyone. This time Lindsey *flies* over seven! Rebecca Starr premieres a new solo act. It's just her and a table, over, around, and through which she contorts herself. Circus acts come in three kinds: stuff pretty much anyone can do; stuff you couldn't do; stuff you can't imagine *anyone* doing. Starr's balletic gymnastics begin with phase two — a series of spidery moves — then advance to phase three by doing a hand-stand and curling her legs over her head so her toes block her eyes.

Tony Muñoz does rope tricks Roy Rogers





wouldn't dare, among them spinning a lariat into a six-foot circle, then hopping through it, and back.

Columbina (Chervl Lindley) climbs a rope ladder, missing enough rungs to fail a Breathalyzer test. She inspires even less confidence when she gets on a swing and almost falls several times — one time catching herself by the ankles at the last second.

Lindley makes pratfalls look unpolished, 25 feet in the air, without a net. After her performance, it's hard to imagine where Fern Street can go from there. But Lindley appears in Act One. And in Act Two, the Fern Street Circus really takes off.

Beehive

Those tall cans of AquaNet spray are back in the spotlight. As are the gigantic domes of hair, worn by the "Hives," in the Theatre in Old Town's reprise of its 1992 hit show. Beehive celebrates the women singers and "girl groups" of the 1960s. But if you caught only the first half hour, you'd swear something's amiss. The six talented performers parody every song and vocalist. As in melodrama they exaggerate gestures and tones, from Lesley Gore to the Supremes (who break up before our eyes) and Patti LaBelle (who, when she sold her heart to the "Junkman," was far more serious than this!). Directed by Paula Kalustian, the production abandons its aura of overkill-silly as the '60s lose innocence. And the second half includes first-rate solos: especially Renae Mitchell as Aretha Franklin, Lisa Payton-Davis as Tina Turner, and Joy Yandell as Janis Joplin. The show captures some of the texture of the era. Iill K. Mesaros's costumes are a history lesson (the times weren't the only thing "a-changin'" back then; styles made 180-degree turns about every three years). Jasper Grant's four-piece band keeps the evening cruising. To the young, however, Nick Reid's set may require an explanation. What are those big black round thingies all over the place? Phonograph records. The ones with big holes in the center were 45s. And for the generation of the '60s, they were minted currency. Worth a try.



The music inspires, but the authors need to rethink how the piece gets told. Fire describes black lung, worker exploitation, stereotyping of mountain people, and the ecologi cal rape of strip mining. It could be a call to arms. Instead, it points to abject conditions as if displays in a museum, in effect sealing them off, along with our anger. This is explosive material tempered by a commercial rinse. You want to ask Myler, as the old union song goes "Which side are you on?" Worth a try.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scenemaking, with the au-dience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but San Diego Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow vouth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru,

Way downstage on David Lee Cuthbert's set — a high-rise checkerboard of window frames sits a green bench. In alternating

They become friends. To their surprise - since both have heterosexual backgrounds — a strong attraction grows (to underscore their puzzlement, every time one consults an 8-ball, two replies get stuck). One of the best parts of the Women's Repertory Theatre's best production to date: Jo Anne Glover (Callie) and Jennifer Eve Kraus (Sara) play two different characters within each role: a resistant mind, and a yearning heart. Director Gavle Feldman-Avery and the actors deserve praise for the ways their body language — watch their hands, or how their shoulders lean — contradicts their formal friendship. Stop Kiss isn't just another "outing" play, though. Ow-ing to homophobic brutality, the play's other half illustrates the near-tragic consequences of that kiss (Son's structure's amazing, in fact, as it both joins together and tears apart). Daren Scott and Donal Pugh (back on stage after too long a hiatus) head a strong supporting cast. Worth a try.





the more it is worth." I note that blink bassist Mark Hoppus appeared on a VH1 special last weekend. I ask Georggin if Hoppus is moving

into nonmusical arenas. "I don't know about that. All I know is blink is in the middle of recording its CD." That still-unnamed CD is being recorded at a North

County house that has been converted into a temporary recording studio. Georggin said the planned release date is early October. "They started recording January 4. They should be done in July. After that, they are going to play a lot of festivals in Japan and Europe this summer."

Meanwhile, Rick DeVoe Management pulled off a coup last week when a music video for another band he represents, San Diego's New Found Glory, broke into the

"wannabe" category on MTV's afternoon *TRL/Total Request Live*. Each day *TRL* plays a short clip from a handful of new videos. If the response is good, that video moves from a "wannabe" onto the *TRL* top-ten countdown.

The 50-city New Found Glory/Good Charlotte tour comes to SDSU's Cox Arena June 6. Georggin said the two bands are "co-headliners," but that New Found Glory gets to go on last each night. I wonder if that doesn't cause conflict since Good Charlotte has exploded in popularity over the last few months.

"Not at all," said Georggin. "Each band member has tattoos of the other band on them." — Ken Leighton **Q: When is it possible** to make more money from unemployment benefits than

BECK - Past, Present and Everything In Between.

Beck's show on June 24 at Open Air Theatre, SDSU might just be the show of the summer. Not one to be bound by custom, Beck is mixing it up again for the Summer 2003 tour in support of his latest release, Sea Change. Recent reviews hailed his live show as "authentic and absorbing" (LA Times) and "unbridled enthusiasm" (Rocky Mountain News).

After last fall's outing backed by the Flaming Lips and the preceding solo acoustic tour, Beck has put together a brand new band for the May and June dates. Joining him will be Steven McDonald on bass, drummer Jay Bellerose, Greg Kurstin on keyboards and Josh Klinghoffer on guitar. The new players along with Beck's kaleidoscope of hip-hop, folk, psychedelia, pop and rock & roll are sure to make this one for the ages.

Sea Change was release late last year to overwhelming critical acclaim. Rolling Stone called it "a perfect treasure of soft, spangled woe sung with a heavy open heart... It's the best album Beck has ever made" and Time Magazine remarked

MCA, founded in 1924, and Geffen are both part of the Universal Music Group, the world's largest record conglomerate. Other MCA artists include B.B. King, the Who, the Roots, and Mary J. Blige.

In January, MCA president Jay Boberg quit after nearly eight years with the label.

"Everything will stay the same," said Georggin. — Ken Leighton

Frosty, of the band the Icons, says he is so mad about dishonest record distributors who ripped off his hip-hop group that he is actually rapping the names and phone numbers on a new song called "EFF U PAY ME." The song appears on the new Icons CD NEEDLESMICSCANS-LINOLEUM.

"The needles is for the DJ, the mikes is for the MC, cans is for the graffiti artist, and linoleum is for the break dancer," explains Frosty, who also said he was ripped off by

three different promoters in three different states. About one of the promoters, Frosty said, "I

got every kind of runaround imaginable from them like 'We'll get you a check' to 'We had personnel changes.' It was one big circular action."

Frosty does think the shaky business dealings affect the hip-hop industry more than other genres. "The economy is not great. A lot of companies are getting swallowed up. The market is saturated. I think a lot of these companies have extended themselves too much with unproven talent. We are not unproven. Anything we ever sent sold out."

I note that a lot of hiphop artists like 50 Cent and Jay-Z seem to create bad situations just so they can have something to rap about.

"This is 100 percent real beef right here. I can taste this beef.... A lot of these assholes who rap about money are

rapping about their \$50,000 Rollie [Rolex] or their \$300,000 car. That's not us. These people are impacting our ability to make another



Last Friday the USMC allowed Gracin to join the American Idol summer tour, which begins July 8 in St. Paul, Minnesota. — Ken Leighton


Cheech Marin was

L.A. trio the Eddies have released Manual Scan's "Jungle Beat" on their new album In the Sunshine.

Viewers of The Tonight Show on May 13 were treated to a cameo appearance by Encinitas writer Paul Williams (founder in 1966 of the original rock magazine, Crawdaddy! and husband of local songwriter Cindy Lee Berryhill). Guest Yoko Ono screened for Jay Leno a clip from the "Give Peace a

Chance" video, and Williams was seen briefly.

Mendoza, a close friend of Williams's, says the Crawdaddy! publisher has discussed his disappointment over the cancellation of the legendary magazine due to declining revenue and downsizing in the publishing field. An editorial in the final issue (#28) includes Williams reporting that Crawdaddy! may see new life as an online zine, pending interest and investors. — Jay Allen Sanford



hicago made its appearance in the American consciousness during the 19th Century *as an important trading post in the young*

country's northwest, situated close to Fort Dearborn, erected in 1803 on the south bank of the main river, near what was later to become the approach to the Michigan Avenue bridge. Herbert Asbury, whose *Gangs of New York* was the basis for the recent Scorcese movie, also wrote a book about the Chicago underworld in which he describes the site of the city thus:

The country on both sides of the main stream of the Chicago River was very low and wet, a depressing expanse of bogs and sloughs: while what is now the city's principal business section, the famous Loop district, was

cipal business section, the famous Loop district, was only a few inches higher than the level of Lake Michigan, and in consequence was under water for several months of the year. The mouth of the river was choked with sand, preventing the passage of any vessel larger than a canoe or rowboat; the stream it-

self was filled with wild rice except for a narrow channel, and its banks were covered by a rank and noisome growth of skunk cabbage or wild onion, which gave shelter and sustenance to a large and resentful colony of polecats.

Not the most inviting prospect for our country's second city, but here we are, having ourselves a hot dog and shopping for CDs in what is America's most musical city, if not its most felicitously placed. We are fresh from a trawling expedition at Chicago's big Tower Records, somewhat lighter in the pocket if not hugely impressed. The Chicago store doesn't compare with the New York or London Tower Records, for instance. But, no worries, we have in our sights the Jazz Record Mart, with

one of the world's best selections of jazz and blues recordings, which makes good sense since Chicago has always been *numero uno* so far as jazz and blues are concerned: not New York, not L.A., not nowhere, baby, but big ol' funky Chicago.

Chicago is ground zero for urban blues. The history of the music and its development makes for interesting reading and listening. When we think of Chicago blues we think of the amplified, electric blues performed chiefly by artists on the Chess label in the 1950s, men like Muddy Waters,

Howlin' Wolf, Elmore James, Sonny Boy Williamson, musicians who came to Chicago in the later '40s and early '50s from Mississippi. But the truth of the matter is that long before Muddy got off the train from Clarksdale at the

downtown terminal in 1943, Chicago was the urban center in America for the blues. The name Lester Melrose will probably be

unfamiliar to most readers, even among blues enthusiasts, and certainly less familiar than the names of Leonard and Phil Chess, but so far as black music made it onto the airwaves and jukeboxes during the '30s and '40s, there was one man and one man only behind the music, and that was A&R man

and producer extraordinaire, Lester Melrose. Born in Olney, Illinois, in 1891, Melrose, a white man, had been actively producing black artists since the '20s, initially working with jazzmen like King Oliver and Jelly Roll Morton, among others. After Prohibition ended in 1933, taverns began opening all over, most of them with a new invention on hand called the jukebox. From 1934 to 1951, most all

of the rhythm and blues one could hear on a jukebox in black taverns and booze joints throughout Chicago - over 90 percent of it, in fact — was produced by Melrose for the "race" records divisions of either RCA Victor/Bluebird or Columbia, two of the biggest labels around. Over time, Melrose produced an unprecedented gallery of black musical talent, including Memphis Minnie, Big Bill Broonzy, Tampa Red, Big Joe Williams, Bukka White, Arthur "Big Boy" Crudup, and Sonny Boy Williamson #1 (as dis tinct from Rice Miller, Sonny Boy #2), who was responsible for transforming the blues harmonica from an accompa-

nying instrument to a solo role, spawning such later blues masters as Little Walter, Junior Wells, and Sonny Boy #2. Along with this stellar lot, Melrose also produced Bukka White, Victoria Spivey, Lonnie Johnson, Leroy Carr, Big Macao, and Roosevelt Sykes.

Melrose described how he went about finding talent, and one would be hard-pressed to find someone who found more:

> My record talent was obtained through just plain hard work. I used to visit clubs, taverns, and booze joints in and around Chicago, also I used to travel all through the Southern states in search of talent, and sometimes I had very good luck. As a rule I had considerable trouble with plantation owners, as they were afraid that I would be the cause of their help refusing to return.

Big Bill Broonzy And more than once Melrose had to beat a hasty retreat from situations

where a white "Yankee" was very unwelcome. Melrose's artists tended to be country people,

blacks from places like Mississippi, Georgia, Arkansas,

and Tennessee. He recorded jazz artists and novelty numbers as well as the blues. And he was very involved in the music; he knew what kind of sound he was after and got it out of his musicians. There was a Melrose sound, a house sound, if you will. It was definitely urban in nature, as distinct from the



country blues, but it was a mother sound that most would nowadays identify as the Chicago blues sound. It was very much a combo sound, with bass, drums, piano, and often a horn in there backing it up. Rehearsals were usually at Tampa Red's house and with a semi-regular group of musicians on hand backing up whoever was leading the session. This resulted in, if not a sameness of sound, an identifiable sound, which entailed pass-

ing the classic country blues through the filter of vaudeville, producing a lighter, mellower, more "civilized" music designed for a new urban black audience that aspired toward refinement but still liked a jolt of old-fashioned in their musical fare.

Just as the prospect of jobs and freedom from plantation life drew thousands of tenant farmers from the Deep South to Chicago in the 1920s, an ever larger influx of Southern blacks took place during and after the Second World War. This new wave of blacks was not going to be satisfied with the blues coming from the catalogs of RCA Victor/Bluebird and Columbia. They wanted a rougher sound, a blues with the rawness, drive, and drama they had become accustomed to down on the Delta. The Melrose house sound, as exceptional as it was musically, just wasn't hitting the spot.

Enter stage left, two recent immigrants from Poland, Jews who arrived in Chicago in 1937, started a liquor business, and got some big ideas. ■

asked. His friend replied, "There's an F Street [bookstore] on one side and Deja Vu [strip club] on the other and Les Girls around the corner. Maybe that's why."

I was surprised myself to see only three people when I walked in. (By the time the band started at ten, there were closer to 20.) Henry, the 80-year-old owner, told me, "This building has been here since the '30s. In the '60s, my girlfriend was a topless dancer here when it was called the Dollhouse."

Henry went on to tell me about owning the Texas Tea House in Ocean Beach for 17 years, where he was one of the first to book Mojo Nixon, now a DJ on KGB.

I have to admit, it would be nice to see this place get some more bands, and some more patrons.

Rice, Not Riko

A white double-stretch limo slides to the curb. The chauffeur opens the rear door and out pop 11 half-pixilated men in business suits, aged 30 to 60-plus, like so many plainclothes circus clowns exiting a VW bug. By threes and fours they reel into Hotel W, inexorably drawn to Magnet, the vast, hip lobby bar. The types who always want to go to the beach head for Beach, the second-floor fair-weather rooftop bar famed for the dune of warmed sand on its floor. (W seems to go for conceptual art nomenclature.) A darkly intimate bar called the Living Room has its windows masked in red gel, the better not to see you too clearly, my dear. The same crowd that flocks to Cafe Japengo on Thursdays flies south to hit W's bars on Fridays, waiting for entry in a line snaking halfway around the block. Those young lawyers, rising dentists, and upcoming MBAs with enough smarts, money, and enthusiasm bypass the lines by renting rooms for the weekend. The room-price? If you have to ask ...

Rice, the hotel's restaurant module, is next door to Magnet. Bar patrons spill over to the restaurant when they get hungry (if they've remembered to reserve), mingling with people who've come specifically to eat. Running the kitchen is executive chef Riko Bartolome, who developed a fanatical following for his highrisk, high-gain fusion cuisine at 150 Grand in Escondido. I was hoping for no less here. Unfortunately, that's not how they play the game at the Hotels W.

If you've tasted Riko's cooking, Rice is liable to break your heart. It's his decision to take the gig, but all Hotel W restaurants feature food created by corporate chefs, who set menus and create recipes from headquarters. Corporate chef Lynne Saatof has worked at Mesa with celebrity chef Bobby Flay and at similar prestigious restaurants back East. All very impressive, but the setup means that Riko generally follows the company line instead of inventing his own. If he vanished tomorrow, the food would be nearly the same. Only one dish, a swordfish, is partly his creation. I didn't know that when I ordered it but at first bite decided that it was the tastiest entrée on our table.

For most of the customers, the ambiance is what matters. Rice is a futuristic, Jetson-like alcove with concrete floors, red neons, and red

walls in one corner, pastel tints, curvy forms, and booths with pull-around ER-type curtains that hint at potential Nasty Nurse naughtiness. A lounge up a short staircase features sofas, where customers eat TV-dinner style, resting their plates on coffee tables or on their laps. The lighting is so dim that you can barely see your plates -- but if I were 30, I'd call that setting the mood.

The appetizer menu sounds as if it was written by TV chef Emeril, lacking only the "bam!"

There are "screaming" oysters, "crackling" calamari, "sizzling" tempura. Shutting our ears to the exploding gerunds, my friends and I grazed our way about halfway through the list, gambling for best bets.

Crab cakes are one good wager, containing rich-flavored crabmeat, from some species with enough moisture and flavor to ride high over the minced bell peppers, scallions, hot peppers, and soft bread binding. The plate was painted with a quote-mark of pleasing smoked chili aioli, opposing a sprightly slaw in a light chile vinai-

grette. "Spicy summer shrimp rolls" aren't exactly spicy, but they're equal to a neighborhood Vietnamese version, and easier to eat. Instead of the Vietnamese-style plate of lettuce and herbs, the mint and greens are part of the rolls' stuffing (so you don't have to wrap your own), intermingled with chunks of perfectly cooked shrimp; the peanut dipping sauce is silky and mild.

A more substantial and very likable starter, "sticky chile chicken wings," features chicken drumettes glazed with honey and Thai sweetchile paste, baked long enough

to give the coating a crunch. They come with a good green dip of limejuice, cilantro and puréed avocado, lending a tart riposte to the sweetness. The menu's retro comfort dish is "tomato-red pepper soup with grilled cheese deluxe," a madefrom-scratch version of Mom's school-day lunch. This version doesn't involve a can from Campbell's: It flaunts roasted fresh Roma tomatoes, peppers, onions, and garlic roughly puréed into a savory soup. The small cubes of grilled cheese sandwich — made just like Mom's, with Old

These are cute, amusing, tasty dishes ---but not really out of the ordinary. You can munch through them with a contented grin and your mind on vour date.

A long list of salads offers more opportunities for light eating. We were attracted to an ahi tuna Nicoise; it featured sesame-coated ahi chunks with the proper combination of green

beans, potato cubes, and Nicoise olives, along with one small roasted tomato, a single anchovy, and a whole egg that's not merely hard-cooked but hard-boiled. We also noticed (but didn't try) an "Old School Caesar Salad" — "old school" because it's made from whole leaves of Romaine lettuce and a semi-classic vinaigrette utilizing pasteurized egg yolks, not risky raw yolks (which would be Old-Old School). Either would make a good choice for a summertime business lunch, nothing to steal attention from the agenda except for a sneaking temptation to hog the anchovy and steal all the olives.

Most patrons around us were nibbling on several "small plates" and sharing a dessert, bright little flavor-blasts for diners who shun commitment. I think that's the right idea, because entrées seem merely optional in W's scheme. Our best main course by far was Riko's sole invention on this menu, miso-glazed swordfish. It arrived as a two-ring circus — a circle of fish and an adjacent circle of rice ringed all around with Chinese long beans. The moist fish was highlighted by a complex, slightly spicy glaze of miso, caramel, ginger, and butter, glazed (like a crème brûlée) under a salamander. The rice was soft, sticky, and sweet, dotted with bits of mango, wisps of cilantro, and tiny, saline rubies of *tobiko* (flying fish roe).

The dryish striped bass wasn't so lucky, with its pleasant but inconsequential sherry vinaigrette. That plate's central point of interest lay in a wedge of comforting shiitake-potato pancake. Both a chicken breast (not free-range but high quality) and a double pork chop got a flavor-boost from brining. The bird emerged juicy, lightly topped with green olives, cherry tomatoes, and herbs, and came with flawless french fries. The huge hunk of lean pork, though, offered too much flesh with too little flavor. We did enjoy its chive mashed potatoes (wanting only more chive) and a challenging chutney of white pearl onions and cranberries stewed in tangy cranberry juice. Cranberries aside, these dishes mainly reminded us of similar dishes at similar restaurants, evoking a sense of Yogi Berra's "déjà vu all over again."

The flavors leap up again for the grand finale. Everybody at my table loved the warm banana "tart" with dulce de leche (Mexican caramel). It isn't exactly a tart, but a school of banana slices coated in caramel syrup, surrounded by chunks of purely wicked praline and topped with a scoop of luscious vanilla bean ice cream. A frozen lemon soufflé is essentially a sherbet, tart-sweet and velvet-smooth. Its elusive "burnt orange caramel" sauce is lighter than it sounds, but the real star of this plate is a supporting character — a fabulous triangular sesame-seed cookie stuffed with chopped fresh fruit. I'm a nut for coconut, so I was quite taken by a "tropical fruit ceviche with coconut sorbet" — a limemacerated fruit salad set in a halved coconut shell, topped by a generous scoop of superb coconut sorbet, with thick shreds of fresh coconut scattered around the plate. Sorbets and ice creams all come from the admirable Neiderfranks in National City, which uses 100 percent natural ingredients. This is fun food, lightly

recreational without much startlement or profundity. That's how the W Hotels want it. The restaurant may look like a glitzy glamour gal, but the food at Rice is...nice.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Rico Bartolome grew up in North County and started out hoping to be an architect until, at 17, he took a job flipping breakfast eggs in Rancho Bernardo to earn tuition money. In short order, he was hooked on cooking. Instead of architecture school, he attended Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York, returning home after graduation to work at the Hyatt Regency La Jolla, where he learned to appreciate Pacific Rim cuisines. By 1990, Bartolome was pioneering "Pacific Rim tapas" at a short-lived downtown restaurant that was, unfortunately, "before its time" for San Diego. His subsequent travels took him to work in Maui and then at Hotel Nikko in Beverly Hills, both of them expanding his knowledge of Pacific cuisines. Drawn home to Escondido again, he stepped into the nearby kitchen at 150 Grand, where he soon developed a devoted following for his innovative fusion cuisine.

Eager for a downtown

gig, he moved on to the Gaslamp's Aqua Blu, but within a month he discovered that his concepts and the owners' didn't mesh. He cooled his heels cooking at a country club until he nailed the job he had his eye on: executive chef at the new Hotel W.

"I took the job because of the W mystique," he says. "I have friends who are chefs at the other Ws around the country, and I was actually waiting for this W to open so I kind of had to take the job. We opened the doors in December and started out going 90 miles an hour immediately, with the holidays and the Super Bowl. Now it's only 85 miles an hour... W is a place that people hang out and want to be seen. On a good night, I've seen lines curling around to Karl Straus. If you like loud, and crowded, and packed like sardines, then it's good for you. It's different from anywhere else in San Diego — but it's like this in all the other Ws. I was just doing a dinner in the W in Los Angeles, and I couldn't get my car out of valet for an hour!

"It's true I'm executing somebody else's menu. The restaurant group, CB5, is going after a concept of the restaurant rather than having an individual chef that has freedom. They've opened over 34 restaurants in the United States, and they have a corporate repertoire of recipes that we follow. I actually try not to change anything, out of respect for the chef who created them, and respect for the company.

"The way I look at it is, my ideas are always going to be there, whether it's here or you never know what paths might come in front of me in the future. I tell other chefs that, too. Like you, the other chefs also tell me, 'You're not doing your food.' But for me it's a great experience over here because I get to learn other aspects of the hotel. It's all about growing. I think that this is a good move because I never had an executive chef position at a hotel on my résumé... In addition to Rice I also have 24hour room service and all the banquets that we do here. When I was working just before this at the Maderas Country Club in Poway, frankly it was an easy job — and after awhile I realized that I missed going 90 miles an hour."

h, no!" Sister Marjie hovers on the curb as a mother duck leads her seven ducklings across the road from the park. Marjie steps out, holds up her hands, and yells, "Ducklings!"

Cars stop. Their drivers stare as the mother and her yellow ducklings quack their way across in a perfect line.

"Traffic stops for wildlife in Alaska too," says Brother Bill. "But usually it's for a 1000-pound moose."

moose." "Uh, this where we're going, Edward?" says Marjie. "Yes," I say. "Look good enough for you?"

"Yes," I say. "Look good enough for you?" Fact is I'm all cat-on-a-hot-tin-roof with these guys. Bill is Carla's brother. From Alaska. Marjie's his wife. Trying to make a good impression here. Carla's working on the evening meal. I promised her I'd take them to some "decent place" for lunch.

We wound up down here in El Cajon, near where Bill and Carla lived when they were kids. "Huh. Magnolia and Main," Bill sighed. "Think this is where my buddies and me used to toss rotten fruit at cars. Saturday nights. We were bad."

The eatery we're standing outside of looks new, even though it has lots of ancient doors and wrought-iron and wooden window frames with creepers winding around them. Pioneering feel. It has tables out here on the sidewalk. Bunch of folks



munching away, plus I see they have a beautiful long bar, with a counter on the street, and chess sets so you can play and watch the world go by.

Then I spot their patio. You walk in through an arched doorway to an area with tables under a browny-red canvas canopy, to

the patio itself.

I plunk us down near a table loaded with giant margarita samples, not far from a huge Mexican fountain, a double BBQ, and a ginormous parrot carved in wood. Looks expensive. White umbrellas, trees, purple bougainvillea:

oh, man, too nice. "Hi. I'm Jennifer. A drink to start you folks off?"

This is the moment I dread. Got 30 rutabagas in my pocket. Couple of those 32-ounce, \$8.95 margaritas and I'm wrecked. "Uh, guess I'll have the iced tea," I say. That's \$1.95. Maybe it's my expression. "I'm driving so I'll have water," says Bill. "Yes. All I want too," says Marjie.

Whew. Jennifer takes it well. She lays down the menus. Bi-ig 18-inch brown cards in plastic. Prices range from just possible to don't even think about it. Appetizers, like Louisiana chicken strips, go for \$6.95. The Downtown Sampler (a mix of calamari, potato skins, fried fish, mozzarella sticks, Louisiana strips, and cheesy garlic bread) is \$10.95. Salads (with garlic bread) start at \$4.25 for a spinach salad and climb to \$11.95 for swordfish Caesar salad.

Sandwiches are within range: a grilled chicken sandwich with fries and coleslaw is \$7.65. A bacon cheeseburger runs \$6.95.

A chicken fajita (with black beans and tortillas) runs \$10.25, steak fajita likewise. Pastas (with garlic bread) run from 9 to 12, 13 bucks. (The chicken fettuccine almost gets me at \$9.95.)

Then I see they have ribs. This could be just doable. A half rack of baby-back pork ribs, \$8.95. I decide to order it straight off, so Bill and Marjie don't feel bad ordering something above basic. I get it with mashed potatoes with gravy and mushrooms, and refried beans.

"Here in the land of health nuts, think I'll have a veggie burger," says Marjie. "My first." I check the price. Ah, \$6.95. I'm starting to ap-

preciate this woman. "Give me the Tex-Mex burrito," says Bill.

Oh, yes, \$5.95. Now I know we'll make it. 'Course, I feel guilty having the most expensive item. But honestly, when our meals come, you wouldn't know they all weren't way expensive. My ribs sprawl across a bi-ig ol' white china plate with the 'shroomy mash, the frijoles, and sprinkles of chopped parsley. I count maybe six ribs with some wicked BBQ sauce slurped over the top. Marjie's veggie burger arrives in a kind of rolled black wire basket, with the burger sitting on a big square of yellow paper, avocado and melted cheese bulging from the bun. And Bill's giant burrito, also on yellow paper, comes in a big woven wicker basket with handles. "Beautiful," says Marjie.

Bill tries to pick up his burrito. It's kind of white alongside his red and green chips and orange salsa. "Looks like a baby beluga whale," he says.

When it collapses, he takes to it with his knife and fork. "See how much they've stuffed in there," he says. "And it's steak, not ground beef." He forks up the meat, salad, cheese, avo, salsa like there's no tomorrow. "Oh, I miss this," he says finally. "Miss my Mexican food."

Marjie says her veggie burger's fine but could be juicier. The great chunky home fries with it are great though. Me, my face is covered in war paint from the ribs. They fill me up so quick I cut off a couple for Bill and Marjie. The BBQ sauce is baked into the meat. To die for.


Jennifer comes up. Turns out she's the manager too. "This used to be a hardware store," she says. "My boss believes once we get more people living here, this downtown will come back to life. It's already starting."

We waddle out pretty satisfied. Least I am. Got away with \$25.64, haven't shamed Carla, and, heck, I actually like these in-laws. "Say, we have time," says Bill. "Feel like buying some old fruit?"

eter Mahan started out over 30 years ago — in cheese. "The Cheese Shop International was the first to bring in Port-Salut, brie, chevre, all these cheeses," he recalls. "At the time, cheese was the hot thing." The company sent Mahan to open a branch in San Mateo, and

it wasn't long before Napa winemakers started using the Cheese Shop as a retail outlet. The affinity was born in Mahan's soul, and when a salesman for the California distributor Wine Warehouse offered Mahan, now in San Diego, a job, he jumped at it.

The old days, naturally, were good old days. Mahan fell in with Bob Morissey,

whose circle of wine-drinking buddies formed the first tasting panel for the fledgling Wine Spectator magazine. He sold wine, much of it from California, to "several key restaurants and wine shops in this city. A lot of them are gone now,' replaced by volume-centered chains and grocery stores. "It's a shame. At the time, we could sell just about anything to anybody; they were interested in trying new things." Now, "the big chains can't be bothered" with small lots of low-priced gems. And today, such wines are Mahan's specialty. He currently serves as director of Wine Warehouse's Heritage of France Selections, and while the company brings in a lot of Bordeaux, it's the interesting little reds from the south of France that command Mahan's interest and enchant his palate

Mahan's swing from New World wine to Old began in the early '80s. "France has many wine

conventions," he says, tasting extravaganzas like the *Grands Jours de Borgogne* in Burgundy. "They have one in the south of France called Adhesion, and in 1982 Adhesion sent Wine Warehouse two tickets to go to this convention — in Cannes and meet about 250 suppliers in a hotel. My boss

loved that they were sending me a free ticket. I said, 'I think I should go to this — it's very crucial,' and he gave me his blessing." Mahan enjoyed his stay in Cannes enough to return, and he

even found a wine or two that caught his eye. But by 1984 he was beginning to feel more adventur-

ous. Rather than going to a hotel "and having guys push me to buy their stuff," he wanted to start searching things out on his own. The timing was ideal. "In 1984, Wine Warehouse was buying from master distributors on the East Coast. They were famous for getting 'exclusives' for certain chateaus and domains, bringing them over and taking excessive margins on them. When the dollar really started to be hurting against the franc, prices here went berserk. Bordeaux wines were excruciatingly expensive."

"I sensed there was a need to go and do our own thing. There was a budding interest in some of the newer wines from France, and these wines were really cheap. I went there in 1984 and found a little wine called Chateau Beauregard. It was the exclusive domain of a huge company, and we [took] it away from them with their graces. They didn't want to be bothered with it; they were more into Chateau Lafite and Petrus" — high-

end Bordeaux. "I paid eight francs a bottle — label, capsule, cork, carton. That was about one dollar a bottle. It cost a dollar to get it over here. When I came to people in the San Diego market and sold them a bottle of wine for \$3, they were ecstatic. mostly It was French restaurateurs — we had a lot more then than we do now. They would say, 'It's only \$3, and it's very good. I'll put it on the list for \$12 or \$15!' It wasn't a great wine, but it was decent, and they got to trust me. Today, after 20 years, it's \$4.99 retail, and it's still with us. I picked up a few more wines, went to the same buddies in the restaurant business, and it just sprouted."

Picking up more wines was largely a matter of knocking on doors and dialing fax machines. "There's a guide in France that lists thousands of wineries — what they

produce, who makes the wine, what their fax number is, and what general philosophy they use in making their wine." (That statement of "general philosophy" was as close as many wineries got to a marketing plan.) "I just started making appointments via the fax machine. Sometimes, I would buy the wine at a shop in Paris and taste it first. I would go over for a week or ten days and drive around with a couple of friends," friends who, being locals, could make an amicable initial approach where necessary. "We would taste their wine, and usually the winery people invited us to come have lunch with them for five hours."

Most folks were delighted to sell him product, and Mahan was delighted to do business with them. "I've never had a written contract with anybody," he boasts. "Only a handshake. And we didn't have to take all the wines they produced. The French are pretty good about that. If all of a winery's wines aren't right for your market, you

have to pick and choose. They don't hassle you about it, [saying things like,] 'If you want my Syrah, you have to buy my Grenache Blanc.'

"Here, there's a lot more pressure from wineries to get distributors to perform and reach goals." There, you buy tiny lots of what you want, and everybody's happy. If the wine isn't right for you, or if you have to part company one day, c'est la vie. Because wine consumption in France is dropping, the export market is key, and selling your Languedoc red in a sexy destination such as Miami or New York is a feather in the cap. But if the U.S. bails on you, there's a whole thirsty world out there. "Most of the little domains on the eastern side of France are open to the public. Six months a year, there are cars and VW buses full of Belgians and Germans and Dutch down there. They're filling up their cars, staying a few days in France, then driving home and filling their cellars. The vigneron gets cash; he's very happy."

BISTRO SOLEIL 641 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-942-9549. Most French food in Encinitas is of the weighty cream-and-demi-glace traditional genre. Soleil offers an alternative with a seasonal menu of light, herbal Provençal specialties. The emphasis is on seafood, and on olive products in-stead of dairy. Dinner, Mondays through Saturdays. Upper moderate. – N.W. (9/01)

CALYPSO CAFE 576 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-632-8252. This "Calypso" has nothing to do with Caribbean music (or food), despite its tropical tiki-hut decor. The cuisine is French, ranging from old warhorses like onion soup and *coq au vin* to newfangled Gallo-Cal-Italian-Pacific Rim hyphenates such as ahi pissaladière (seared tuna pizza). The traditional dishes are generally the most success-ful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. Although there's nothing revolutionary coming from this kitchen, the cooking is generally agreeable. Dinner

nightly, reservations advised. Upper moderate. — N.W. (9/01)

I TRULLI TRATTORIA 830 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-943-6800. An instant hit in Encinitas (where there's no shortage of Italian restaurants), I Trulli serves modern Italian food with fashionable new ingredients. The menu, subtitled "Nouelle Italian Cuisine," resembles the somewhat ambitious, generically "northern Italian" bills of fare that you encounter all over Hillcrest and the Gaslamp. (It is, in fact, a sister restaurant to Hillcrest's Arriverderci.) The signifiers of seriousness are the pink peppercorns, goat cheese, sun-dried tomatoes, and light cream sauces that co-exist with the more traditional mozzarella-tomato sauce arrays. Best bets are the daily specials, which offer the greatest chance for fresh ingredients and some modicum of creativity. Busy, cramped, painfully loud inside. Street pation next to highway is also noisy. Re-serve for dinner or expect an hour's wait on any night of the week. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. – *N.W. (11/01)*

PAUL'S PLACE 3671 Mission Avenue, Oceanside, 760-721-0124. This restaurant looks like a McDonald's or Wendy's (the building used to be a franchise) and the food comes fast, but it's no chain. The menu strikes a balce between American and Greek fare The baked Greek half-chicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gyros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American three-egg breakfast specials with home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburgers, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkeyburger. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

TERIYAKI 101 250 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-632-8813. This surfer hangout has a secret: Behind a gate just south of the restaurant there's a sheltered outdoor dining patio decorated by a tropical mural of island life above and be low the water. RIBOLLITA

MARTIN GONZALEZ Chef/owner, Acqua Al 2, downtown

As a restaurant owner and excecutive chef, most of my meals take place at my restaurant, but when I do get a chance to cook for my wife and one-year-old daughter, one of our favorite dishes is ribollita (reheated vegetable soup). Ribollita is a traditional Tuscan soup. This soup became a comfort food for me while I was living in Florence, Italy, where vegetables, legumes, bread, cheese, and fruit are important and available products to the Florentine kitchen. Ribollita, as simple as it is, is served even at the best restaurants While studying at

Epicius Culinary Institute in Florence, Stefano, my instructor, taught me how to make this delicious soup; that was when I learned that the first and

charbroiled burgers (of beef, fowl, or veggies). Everything comes with rice (white or brown), pleasingly touched most important part of Tuscan cuisine is patience. Stefano was one of the first Italians that I met while in Italy. Not only was he my instructor, but he was also the owner of my favorite restaurant in Florence, Acqua Al 2. Acqua Al 2 is a hangout for foreign students and local Florentines alike. I had the opportunity of working at Acqua Al 2 while at school and after graduating. While I was there, ribollita soup became a regular dish for employee dinners. When I returned from Italy, I cooked numerous meals for my family, and this dish became a favorite for them as well, especially during the cold winter nights. And now my wife has mastered this traditional recipe. I'm sure you will enjoy it as much as we do.

Try German and American dishes like Big John's all-you-can-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage. Owner Big John is a heavyweight Olympic boxer from the former East Germany with an MA in meat sciences. Generous portions abound. Weekends after 4 p.m., he roasts his famous prime rib dinner. VIGILUCCI'S 505 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-942-7332. In the Land of 10,000 Trattorias, this is one of the most popular — and for good reason. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning — that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations include Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Seafood and Steakhouse in Carlsbad. — N.W. (10/01)

THE VILLAGE GRILL 2833 State Street (at Carlsbad Village Drive), Carlsbad, 760-729-3601. Free peanuts while you wait, and a cool street scene outside where you can eat and beautifupeople-watch. Inexpensive. Other location: 627 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-232-2303. — *E.B.* (10/01)

COME ON IN! 1030-B Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-551-1063. Clunky name, but suave Euro-bistro feel with outside tables under trees. This is your escape to "Paree" anytime you can afford La Jolla. Actually, they keep the price of breakfasts — like two "plain and simple" steamed eggs with fresh fruit and toast, or the "Popeye" omelet, with spinach, Parmesan cheese, prosciutto ham, and diced tomato, fruit, and toast — down to a small roar. Course, everybody in this neck of the woods is trying *not* to eat, so expect lots of fruit plates and healthy lunch sandwiches like roasted eggplant with zucchini, bell peppers, tomatoes, and mozzarella. Inexpensive to moderate; dinners a little more expensive. — *E.B. (4/03)*

FRENCH PASTRY SHOP 5550 La Jolla Boulevard (at Forward Street), La Jolla, 858-454-9094. A longstanding fixture of the Bird Rock area, this bakery/restaurant includes both a simple, spacious dining room and a shaded patio (reputedly San Diego's first dining patio). Breakfast — a highlight of the menu — is served until 4 p.m. The whisper-thin crèpes with luscious stuffings speak in a Gallic accent. Other possibilities include omelets, eggs Benedict variations, and fine-quality brioches and roissants. Pastries are moist, fairly light, and very sweet. Dinner entrées focus on updated French classics, e.g., duck breast a' l'orange, with "early bird" bargains. Open daily for breakfast through early dinner. — *N.W. (5/02)*

GEORGE'S AT THE COVE 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-4244. The always-excellent George's, with its first-rate fish and meat menu, boasts three dining levels on its ocean-view site. The first level is the fine dining room, with full menu and gourmet lunch and dinners. Above is the Café, and on top is the Terrace, which is romantic on balmy nights. The Café and Terrace offer identical menus: light meals for lunch, extensive menu for dinner. The Ocean View Room offers high-quality California regional cuisine, with higher prices. Food is well prepared and their famous roasted chicken, bean, and broccoli soup is still on the menu. Incomparable service. Call for exact hours. Expensive, George's gourmet room; moderate to expensive, other rooms. — E.W. (9/99)

HARRY'S COFFEE SHOP 7545 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-7381. When Harry Rudolph II opened Harry's back in 1960, his idea was simple: to create a down-home eatery and soda foun-tain where all La Jolla — rich, poor, Brahmins, and gardeners) — could mix and meet with plenty of good eats. Everyone from Joan Kroc to Junior u to Brooke Shields has been spot ted here, along with regular folks who've been coming in for three decades. Now Harry III reigns quietly among a dozen whirling dervish wait resses at lunch, while his dad still works the breakfast shift. The big hamsteak and eggs is a favorite breakfast, as is the simple, rich "Hot Creamy Oatmeal" with strawberries. Pecan pancakes and thin, crisp waffles ring true to many Easterners (though Harry offers thick Belgian-style waffles, too), and for lunch, turkey burgers and the bacon-loaded British Burger are popular. At the counter, the banter between beenhere-forever waitresses and customers sounds like family life. Nice sidewalk patio, too. Long lines on weekends. In-expensive. — *E.B.* (2/03)

INDIA PALACE 7514 Girard Avenue (at Pearl, across parking lot from Vons), Suite 10, La Jolla, 858-551-5133. In one of the best (and prettiest) Indian restaurants in the area, the refined cuisine of the north is served in a curvacious, serene room with a domed ceiling. Most dishes are gently spicy, but you can specify your preferred hotness. Stunningly tender tandoori sea bass (and a rich, slightly sweet stew made from it, fish *masala*) is a house specialty. Vegetable entrées are also outstanding, particularly the sprightly *navrattan korma*, mixed veggies in a luscious nutty, creamy yogurt sauce. Other fine choices include tandoori lamb dishes, stir-fried prawns *karahi*, lamb *pasanda*, and elven house-made Indian breads. Fried appetizers, however, tend to be greasy, and chicken in all preparations is overcooked dry breast meat. For dessert, don't miss the fresh, fruity house-made mango *kulfi* (Indian ice milk). Service is competent and cordial. Reserve for weekends. Open daily. Bargain-price buffet lunch (à la carte also available). Dinners inexpensive to low moderate, with a price-leap for tandoori meats. — *N.W.* (6/01)

THE PANNIKIN CAFE 7467 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-5453. Oh sure, the inside of this converted bungalow is cool, with its woody-green tables of different heights and cool damsels with animal temp-tattoos on their arms serving you. But here at Pannikin's La Jolla outpost, the outside's the "in" spot, with its brick and earth tones and weathered timber and sixties rainbow tables. But you have to make it through the laptop-clacking, cell phone-blabbing crowd who use this as their garden office and Very Important Meeting spot. Musicians, grad stu-dents, and school kids also show up to munch twigs and nuts and think seri-ous thoughts. Breakfasts are mostly steamed-egg variations, including the popular Greek eggs and a filling break-fast burrito. For lunch, a mild chicken curry is a nutty treat, and "pannwiches' such as ham or tuna are fresh, gener-ous, and worthy, though the retros among us will be looking for a salt lick all the way home. Inexpensive. — E.B. (2/03)

ROY'S 8670 Genesee Avenue, Costa Verde Center (across from UTC), La Jolla, 858-455-1616. Our own noisy outpost of top Hawaii chef Roy Yamaguchi's ever-expanding chain has elements of both "top chef" and "chain" about it. Decoding Roy's Rules of Ordering can make the difference between a mediocre dinner and a very happy meal: 1. Steer clear of combination platters — the same dishes come off much better when ordered separately; 2. You can get any element of a combo (including the yummy off-menu ahi poke) by asking for it; 3. Don't waste your palate (or money) on weak umbrella drinks when the wine list is brilliant. The menu changes daily, but some frequent tasty choices are pot stickers, *lumpia*, "Kahana" *shutome* (swordfish), or chocolate soufflé. Special dietary requests accommodated, including vegetarian meals. Reserve, and hope for a table far from the raucous bar. Open nightly. Very expensive. — *N.W.* (4/01)

SANTE RISTORANTE 7811 Herschel Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-1315. The name is Italian for "saint," and the Northern Italian/regional cooking shines here, especially the fish and seafood dishes. Fresh seafood specials are available every night, in addition to those on the menu. Excellent chopped salad, pasta with mushrooms, ravioli with quail, and lamb chops. Separate room for bar; separate private dining room. Lunch weekdays; dinner nightly. Enclosed patio for lunch. Not to be missed. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — *E.W.* (4/99)

SUSHI ON THE ROCK 7734 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-1138. This noisy, high-energy spot — a boxy, sa-loon-like space with a sushi bar in back - draws a lively twenty-something crowd (although older folks will have plenty of company, too). Unlike more traditional sushi bars, there's a vast selection of "rock and rolls" huge, creative *futo-maki* party sushi. And they're fabulous, with sparkling fresh seafood and immensely clever combinations. Try, for instance, the shrimp tempura roll, which wraps fried shrimp, crab shreds, daikon sprouts and Japanese mayo in deep-fried salmon skin — the combo would be just as impressive as an appetizer at a top Cal-French restaurant. The Orange Crush is another sublime invention, fresh and crunchy with veggies and to-biko wrapped in suave salmon. Even simple rolls are so well-conceived, and the rice so nicely seasoned, you won't need soy-wasabi dip. The one-time menu of cooked dinner entrées, how-

ADAM'S STEAK N' EGGS 1201 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-291-1103. Morning munchers take heart! Adam's has served nothing but breakfasts since 1966. The menu runs from healthy - hot oatmeal with raisins, dates, sunflower seeds, almonds, pineapple and coconut - to corn fritters to a Southern brunch of spicy sausage patties, biscuits, gravy, grits, and eggs, to spiced apple crepes with whipped cream and pecans. But the signature dish is steak and eggs. The steak's a high-walled chunk of meat al-most as thick as it is round. Comes with two eggs, potatoes or grits, and toast or tortillas. You won't need lunch. This bricky, dark wood, clubby, businessconvention-tourist kind of place has ver-ry faithful customers. But if you want to walk there, be ready for lack of sidewalks, one-way bus access, and wild morning traffic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

ALADDIN'S CAFE 5420 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-573-0000; Uptown Shopping Cen-ter, 1220 Cleveland Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-574-1111. These cafés offer a bright, clean atmosphere for bright and clean, if rather generic, Middle Eastern favorites (hummus, tabbouleh, kebabs, shawerma, etc.), plus imaginative Lev-antine-flavored pizzas and salads. There are ample choices for vegetarians. The Hillcrest location offers beer and wine. Inexpensive to moderate. -N.W. (11/00)

DUMPLING INN 4619 Convoy Street #F, Kearny Mesa, 848-268-9638. Hole-in-the-wall? Yes. But what a hole-inthe-wall. For those who love the Far East and its food, finding the Dumpling Inn is a little revelation. It's located in the busy Jasmine/Korean Market Center, among Oriental herbalists, mansize-vase shops, stores with jewelry, fresh fish, even Feng Shui experts. The Inn itself is tiny but charming. Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold firecrackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd conical straw hat. The food is serious, but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried Three-Ingredients *lo mein* (thick noodles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are chal-lenging, as is the Dumpling Dinner (inlenging, as is the Dumpling Dinner (in-cluding hot-and-sour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork, bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jellyfish salad — crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Closed Monday. Inexpensive Closed Monday. THE GOOD EGG 7947 Balboa Avenue (off Convoy Street), Kearny Mesa, 858-565-4244. The menu offers omelets, gournet pancakes, waffles, and several different kinds of frittatas. Freshly squeezed fruit juices are avail-able, and for lunch there are burgers, salads, and a long list of sandwiches. Breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — E.W.

NEW SHANGHAI 4681 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-569-4833. New Shanghai is busy, friendly, and draws a mostly Chinese clientele be-cause their Chinese food isn't "Amer-icanized." Whatever your gastronomic politics, try the generous plateful of dry braised shrimp, the "de-fatted pork shoulder," the hot tripe, and the ingenious red bean pancake dessert. Inexpensive to moderate. — M.N. (4/99)

SHOGUN KOBE 5451 Kearny Villa Road, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-7399. This restaurant specializes in well-seasoned Japanese-style steaks, either by themselves or in combination with lobster, shrimp, or scallops. All entrées arrive with soup, salad, rice, and Japanese-style vegetables. Seating is communal at the *teppan* tables. There's also an attractive, well-stocked sushi bar. Open daily. Moderate to expensive. — E.W.

THE BEACHES

CHATEAU ORLEANS 926 Turquoise Street (at Mission Boulevard), Pacific Beach, 858-488-6744. Just like eating in the French Quarter — at one of Bourbon Street's best tourist traps, complete with live music and party atmosphere. The lovely multiroom premises have a real Crescent City "let the bon temps rouler" feel to it, but the simpler Southern dishes — honest crabcakes, fried catfish — seem better bets than the kitchen's attempts at more demanding Acadian fare. Reservations strongly advised. A little dressy on weekends. Full bar. Wheelchair users may need help with rest room doors. Dinner Monday through Satur-day. High moderate. — *N.W. (2/02)*

FAIROUZ CAFE AND GALLERY 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at low cost. Open daily lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *E.W.*

IARED'S 880 East Harbor Island Drive. Harbor Island, 619-291-1028. The house specialty is steak, offered in a room directly on the harbor. Presenta-tion, in the manner, of Morton's, is to show you the entrées raw. Price of entrée includes nothing else; vegetables, potatoes à la carte. Excellent appetizers, especially five-onion tart. First-rate bread and bread pudding. Dinner only, Tuesday through Sunday; closed Mon-day. Expensive. — *E.W.*

KARINYA THAI & VEGETARIAN CUISINE 825 Garnet Street (SeaCoast Square), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie *The Beach*, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes get-ting off on the coconut curries like *gang ped*, *panang*, and *kang kari*. Or noodle dishes like the famous *pad thai*. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai origins. The tom yum kung (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table. the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course *nam pla*, Thai fish sauce. A nice counterpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: *pad talay*, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in *The Beach*. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (2/03)

LOTSA PASTA 1762 Garnet Avenue Pacific Beach, 858-581-6777. The menu of this large, loud family restau-rant offers a clever gimmick: You pick your noodles (from 9 flavors, 6 shapes, plus 7 stuffed pastas), then choose one of 17 sauces to dress them. For a little extra, you can add ingredients such as garlic shrimp, bread-heavy meatballs, or good spicy sausage, or create a pastacombo. Entrées come with salad or soup (with 3 flavor choices either way) and garlic bread. But don't expect authentic Italian cooking, or even Italian-

American: the fare is more small-town American-Italian, with uniformly thick pastas, mainly weighty sauces, and copious wafts of oregano. (The vodka sauce and Thai peanut sauce aren't too bad.) The biggest deal here is timpano a bread-shell enclosing a cornucopia of pastas, sauces, cheeses, and meats (made famous by the movie *The Big Night*). A retail counter offers most items for take-home do-it-yourself. Wines are cheap, and taste like it. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

RANCHOS COCINA 1830 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-226-7619; 4705 Point Loma Avenue, Ocean Beach, 619-224-9815. Also at 3910 30th Street (at University Avenue), North Park, 619-574-1288. At all locations of this delightful mini-chain, you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak - in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an antojito stuffed with beef - it's stewed, not ground. And sample some-thing with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, tryanything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No reservations, but call ahead for large parties. Inexpensive. — N.W. (6/01)

SPORTSMEN'S SEAFOODS 1617 Quivira Road, Mission Beach, 619-224-3551. Fifty years ago this restaurant-fish market was a tuna cannery, part of San Diego's late-lamented fishing industry. The same Sicilian fam-ily still owns it, and still knows everything about fish and how to cook it. The menu is devoted to the "fruits of the sea" and includes a wonderful seafood platter (shrimp, squid, clams, fish, fries, and salad). And, of course, a crispy-crunchy fish-and-chips platter. Eat outside on deck, contemplating the small ships on the bay. They buy sea-sonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their attached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fishermen. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Mondays. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

THE THIRD CORNER 2265 Bacon Street (at West Point Loma), Ocean Beach, 619-223-2700. Chef Derek Ridgeway (collaborating with owner Ed Moore, also of Thee Bungalow across the street) focuses here on Mediterranean-style seasonal seafood, with some meat and poultry entrées for dedicated carnivores. The fare is highly creative but rational — try the ethereal (not an oxymoron) cabbage-wrapped seafood "chartreuse" with sauce Nan-tua, the wild mushroom strudel, the potato-crusted salmon, or the lake whitefish in any preparation. A huge wine list offers food-friendly bottlings chosen to complement the cuisine at below-normal markups. To request a specific wine from Thee Bungalow's arger cellar, call ahead. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. -NW(4/03)

UMI SUSHI 2806 Shelter Island Drive (at Shafter, off Scott), Point Loma, 619-226-1135. An instant neighbor hood success, this large, cheerful sushi bar and dinner house also offers Japanese and Korean entrées, including teppanyaki (cooked in the kitchen, not at the table). Korean ribs, and excellent beef teriyaki of gently grilled prime beef. Sushi highlights include lemony *ama ebi*, rich garlic tuna, and a "Crazy Boy" roll spicy enough to divert your palate from the presence of imitation crabmeat. Free parking lot (often full). Special kids' menu available. Lunch and dinner daily. Sushi prices lower than most; entrées inexpensive to moderate. - N.W. (4/03)

WORLD FAMOUS 711 Pacific Beach Drive, Pacific Beach, 858-272-3100. Located directly on the boardwalk with an unobstructed view, this casual restaurant offers patio or indoor dining. Food preparation is straightforward — nothing fancy, but fresh, wholesome, and offering large portions. Thirty appetizers available in the bar. Combination dinners with steak and seafood are expensive. Brunch is served Saturday and Sunday to 3 p.m.; breakfast, lunch, and dinner daily. Inexpensive to expensive. — *E.W.*

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

BIG KITCHEN 3003 Grape Street (ben 30th Street and Fern Street). South Park, 619-234-5789. This isn't just a restaurant, it's the social center of the universe — and Judy "The Beauty" Forman is its queen. Blame her for the Fern Street Circus, for driving the Miss California beauty pageant out of town, and for disgustingly healthy dishes like Judy's Favorite (spinach, mushrooms, sherry, and eggs). Our favorite: the avocado, cream cheese, and chives omelet. Vegans' fave may be the "veg-gie option": sautéed spinach, mushrooms, onions, cilantro, brown rice, tofu, and roasted garlic. Her cooks make pretty much everything on the spot, including muffins, waffles, and pancakes. While you're waiting, they always have this "out there" eclectic crowd, plus walls filled with pictures and *bon mots* like "Will Be President For Food." Breakfast and lunch only; closes at 2 p.m. most days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/02)

IYOTI-BIHANGA 3351 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-282-4116. Oh sure, you'll be watching Sri Chinmoy, the Bengali guru, on TV juggling, declaring Geneva International Airport "Peace Blossom," or boarding his Italian "Treno della Pace." Plus, his books, his portraits, his paintings, and his chant-songs surround you. Apart from that, not only is this heavenly blue-domed restaurant run by his students peaceful, but the fresher-thanfresh Bengali-tinged health food is delicious. Their chutney-topped "Neatloaf" bursts with nutty, intriguing licious. flavors. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes differ-ent. Also delish: Brahma Burrito, "Infinite Blue" (interesting brown rice salad with bleu cheese dressing), and the Shiva Wrap (tofu and fresh veggies with a well-integrated curry flavor). On cold days, start with a steaming sweet pea soup. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

LA CAMPANA MEXICAN RESTAU-RANT 2479-A Broadway (at 25th Steet), Golden Hill, 619-232-8756. Don't be fooled by the strip mall location. Jefe Arturo's wonderful specialties include cochinita pibil, roast suckling pig in sauce; a nice, thick pozole, pork and hominy soup; and tacos filled with various odd parts of the steer, including the sweet meat of the cheeks. Decor includes campanas (traditional bells) and old photos of Arturo's hometown, Tepic, the riverport capital of Nayarit. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday; closes early Mondays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/01)

MAILO'S CAFE 4095 30th Street. North Park, 619-528-1602. OK, so Mailo's is a Greek café and Mailo and Blanca aren't Greek, they're Mexican-American. On the other hand, Mailo cooked in an OB Greek restaurant for 14 years before he opened here. Plus, the two have made Greek extremely affordable. Prices are definitely down there for their breakfast gyros, with eggs, lamb, tomatoes, and onion rapped in a hot pita. And they have this great street-corner outside deck to eat on. There's also plenty of Ameri-can standard fare. Mailo's cheeseburger, with avocado and bacon, is the most popular, with the half-pound steak burger close behind. American breakfasts are the old fashioned kind with three eggs any style, hash browns, and toast, plus ham or bacon or sausage or even chicken fried steak, at bargain prices. Same for their roast beef din

ner, or the quarter chicken, Greek style, served with rice, salad, and pita bread. Open Tuesday through Saturday breakfast through dinner, Sunday and Monday till 4 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

MAMA'S BAKERY AND LEBANESE DELI 4237 Alabama Street, North Park, 619-688-0717. This informal little restaurant is more interested in quality than presentation, concentrating on the specialties they do well. Mama's offers quick meals with a culinary tradition, definitely not "fast food," but with fast food prices and ease. Recommendations include the deliciously cheap falafel sandwich in Mama's fresh-made *sajj*, (soft flatbread). On cool days warm up to a bowl of *fool mudamas*, or slow-cooked beans (tasty fava and garbanzos). Try also spinach pie, *labneh* (creamy cheese, olive oil, and pita), and *baba ghanoush* (smoky pureed eggplant and hummus). Inexpensive. — *M.N. (1/99*)

VESUVIO GOURMET 3025 El Cajon Boulevard, North Park, 619-282-7040. Wonderful Southern and regional Italian food is served here. The interior is gorgeous, the service swift, and the servings huge and tempting. Open nightly for dinner. Inexpensive to upper moderate. — *E.W.*

EAST COUNTY & STATE COLLEGE

ANTONIO'S HACIENDA 700 North Johnson Avenue, El Cajon, 619-442-9827. If the décor hasn't been updated from its original 1960s-fabulous Old California Spanish, it's be-cause there's been no need. The enormous dark-wood chandeliers, the padded-leather wooden chairs, the chainsaw-weathered wood beams — all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, reveling in the guitar trio and the exposed kitchen station — such atmosphere! And the flavors are userfriendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. The Camarones Tequila is a little more exciting; the sweetness of its baconwrapped shrimp gets a fine counter from the bitter liquor in the marinade. Excellent Enchiladas Suizas: pale, mush-tender shredded chicken wrapped in tortillas and doused with good, tangy green sauce. Lunch and dinner daily. Champagne brunch on Sundays, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; all-day buffet Sunday through Thursday. Inexpensive to low moderate. A.M. (4/03)

ASWAN 7404 University Avenue (at Lowell Street), La Mesa, 619-697-0361. Louisiana and East Africa share the menu at this spacious restaurant "where the Mississippi meets the Nile." Most dishes are made to order, so don't expect to eat and run. Start with a sampling of Maryam Suliman's Somalian sambussas (of chicken, beef, spinach, potato, lentils, shrimp, cheese, fruit) — each savory filling is differently seasoned. Then dive into a bowl of coowner Vernon Sukumu's exemplary seafood gumbo. You can taste the Big Easy in every bite of NOLA-born chef Patrick Kavanaugh's Louisiana dishes, including an unbeatable jambalava, or you can opt for African specialties such as *tibsi, zigni*, Somalian spaghetti, or a vegetarian sampler. "All you can eat" weekend brunches offer items from both cuisines, including fried turkey. No alcohol, no pork, all meats *hallal* (Muslim-butchered). Lunch/dinner Tuesday through Friday, brunch/dinner weekends. Low moderate. N.W. (2/02)

N.W. (2/02) **JOHNNY B'S** 4738 Fourth Street (at La Mesa Boulevard), La Mesa, 619-464-2465. This "Burgers and Brew" bair is a real 1950s place, with burgers to die for and good bar snacks, including a zesty jalapeño dip. Play pool, watch TV, hide from your ex on the smokers' patio out back. On Sundays (1 p.m. to 7 p.m. only), their 10-oz. New York steak, fries, beans, and salad is a must-eat at a rock-bottom price. Open daily; lunch and dinners Monday through Thursday; three meals (until midnight) Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/00)

TYLER'S TASTE OF TEXAS 576 North Second Street, El Cajon, 619-444-9297. Unfussy home cooking. Some dishes outshine others. The slab of smoky ham steak that comes with the first-rate breakfast is in itself enough to rouse the sleepiest appetite. Expertly sautéed onions and mushrooms lend flavor to fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebblysmooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character. For lunch and dinner, the Texas menu features Texas-style barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and sausage) that's sufficiently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. BBQ beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. Pleasant surprises: a substantial, peppery cornmeal crust on the tender catfish and the fried green tomatoes, and the rich stock in the vegetable soup. Open 24 hours. Inexpensive to low moderate. — A.M. (2/02)

WOODSTOCK'S PIZZA 6548 El Cajon Boulevard (at Rolando Boulevard), College Area, 619-265-0999. It's a college pizza joint, but the fare rates well above standard beer ballast. (For that matter, the beers — local Stone Pale Ale, Karl Strauss, Arrogant Bastard Ale, and Wyder's Pear Cider, along with the usual Coors Light and Bud — aren't exactly chug-suds.) Crusts — white or sweetly robust whole wheat — are pressed, tossed, and then folded over at the edge, producing a spongy, crunchcrusted rim. The mozzarella is rich, gooey whole-milk; the marinara sauce is dark and spicy; and the toppings are fresh, hearty standouts. Watching your weight? Two low-fat combos (half the cheese) are available. Happy hour 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. to midnight—your 32-oz. Karl Strauss drops from \$4.25 to \$2.50. Inexpensive. — A.M. (4/02)

FAR EAST

BADLANDS MARKET/CAFE The Mall, 561 Palm Canyon Drive (south side of the street), Borrego Springs, 760-767-4058. This is an epicure's oa-sis in the desert, a combination of gourmet deli and serious café where you can find a lively breakfast, scrump tious picnic lunch, or (on weekends) a light, savory dinner from an imagina-tive, daily changing menu. Great cheeses, pâtés, extra-virgin oils, artisan breads, delicate pastries and full-bod-ied French Roast coffee are among the delights that make this the Garden of Eatin' in a town where both grocery stores are pretty dire. Open Sunday to Thursday for breakfast to late lunch: Friday and Saturday until 7 p.m. Inexpensive to low moderate. N.W. (4/03)

BERNARD'S The Mall (way in back), 503 Palm Canyon Drive, Borrego Springs, 760-767-5666. Owner Bernard Hess must be from Alsace, on the French-German border — who else would offer both frog's legs in garlic sauce and a tasty, credible *choucroute garni* (sauerkraut and smoked meat casserole, including house-smoked

At this local favorite, the space divided between a convivial bar and a dining room with lunch-counter and booth seating, the menu includes German, French, and truck-stop U.S. classics — *schnitzel* side by side with chicken-fried steak. The waitresses know most patrons by name, and the patrons walk in already knowing what they're going to order — mainly the Alsatian specialties. Wine list runs to third-rate Californian, but there's an affordable Trimbach Riesling (and beer works with this food, too). Open daily, brunch to dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *N.W.* (4/03)

OLD OAK INN 1367 Dewey Place, Campo, 619-478-9924. Don't blink, or you might miss this hub of the wayout-there downtown Cameron Corners, near the Campo steam train depot. The family who runs it has been homesteading this patch of country since 1868. The food is good, solid traditional American fare, from ham, eggs, and hash brown potatoes to barbecued beef "piled high" on a toasted bun with French fries and salad, to the threepiece chicken basket dinner. The great pleasure is to fill up, go outside, and then just listen to the silence. Open daily, lunch and dinner; kitchen closed from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (9/01)*

PABLITO'S OF THE DESERT 590 Palm Canyon Drive (in The Center, #8), Borrego Springs, 760-767-3311. Pablito's claims "Authentic Mexican Cuisine, patio dining, and great tequila margaritas." Well, the gorgeous patio is open only during busy times and the cuisine runs to gringo favorites in the Mexican mode (lots of combo platters), but the flavors are honest and pleasing. The most authentic dishes come from the "Specialties" section of the menu, including a good *chile verde* (pork in green chile sauce), numerous varieties of enchiladas, and several flavors of *chilaquiles*. Full bar, including sangria, margaritas, Mexican beers. Open daily, lunch and dinner (with break between). Inexpensive to low moderate. — *N.W. (4/03)*

RAMON'S SMOKEHOUSE BBQ 1730 Alpine Boulevard, Suite 110, Alpine, 619-445-1008. The smell of mesquite wood burning under fresh-cut beef rib is beyond resistance. The secret Texas recipe draws crowds. Go Sunday morning, especially, when chefs in maroon aprons dance around the fat-spitting fire, disappearing into the clouds of fragrant smoke to flip the racks of beef and pork ribs. In good weather you can eat out back next to an authentic chuck wagon. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

ANTICO TOSCANO 1288 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-2768. Home-style cooking from Tuscany, unpretentious, filling, inexpensive. Good soups, salads, pastas. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.* (2/00)

BOMBAY EXOTIC CUISINE OF IN-**DIA** 3975 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-3155. We're talking northern India here, right? That means lots of lamb, potatoes, creamy sauces, tan-door-baked breads, chicken, and less of the south's mouth-scalding heat. At least in their daily buffet, Bombay's a lot less spicy (though their sag *paneer* — creamy, cheesy spinach — delivered a surprising punch). The buffet includes tandoori chicken, assorted *pakoras* (lentil-batter fritters), mock duck, chicken *tikka*, and if you hit the right day, an addictive mango soup. If you want meat or spicy food, best to order from the menu — say, a creamy tikka masala with lamb, or long kebabs of minced lamb (kebab curry), or the rich Bombay Coconut Malai. Tell them whether you want it mild, spicy or, for leathermouths, "*tikhi*." For a cheap, light meal, try a couple of lamb samosas. And be sure they bring the chutneys, India's real unexplored treasure. Open lunch and dinner; buffet at lunch and Monday evenings. Moderate. — *E.B.* (4/03)

CALIFORNIA CUISINE 1027 University Avenue (between 10th and Vermont), Hillcrest, 619-543-0790. This 20-year-old neighborhood favorite underwent an exciting total remake in February, 2003. The hard-edged, mir-

rored decor's the same, but a new chef, Justin Hoehn (coming from Laurel), has replaced the lengthy grazing menu with fewer but better-honed choices that the small kitchen can execute without a hitch. And the guy has a flawless palate. Most appetizers are simple but devilishly clever, literally living up to their name, while entrées exhibit fresh. sophisticated combinations of exquisitely balanced, global flavors, with garnishes smartly chosen to com-plement the primary ingredient. But save room for a sweet: Dessert Chef Laurel Huffnagle produces the bold, thrilling endings that these meals deserve. The restaurant is very noisy when busy. Private garden-patio dining available in good weather. Well-chosen wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Fri-day; dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Upper moderate to expensive. -N.W. (4/03)

CELADON ROYALTY THAI RESTAURANT 540 University Avenue (near Sixth Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-297-8424. The chef has cooked for the Siamese royal family, but more importantly, she hasn't made too many compromises in the cuisine on this side of the Pacific. Some dishes taste luxurious, and all the dishes taste authentic — and very carefully prepared. The regular entrées offer a choice of sauces (red curry, green curry, etc.) with your choice of protein, but go straight to the "Chef's Specialty" items on the menu to find the best and rarest dishes. Stuffed chicken wings are extraordinary, seafood soup *talay* is fabulous, and among the entrées, don't miss *choo chee* duck or the Queen of Thailand's favorite, Pineapple Fried Rice. — *N.W.* (5/02)

CITY DELICATESSEN 535 University Avenue (at Sixth), Hillcrest, 619-295-2747. Some folk come for the Jewish food (chicken-in-the-pot, brisket of beef, chopped liver), others to soak in the art-deco colors — the cornucopia of fruit above the entrance. the mustard yellow walls, the black-and-white checker tile, or the flower bunches of red, blue, green, and yellow lamps. And then some come for both: the stuffed cabbage roll (with ground beef and rice inside) is a glowering red ball with maroon, oniony, sweet-andsour raisin sauce to die for, set off by green parsley and bright orange slices. Scandalously delicious. Downside? Our pastrami sandwich tasted dry and chewy by comparison. But City Deli is less strictly Jewish (they have bacon on their breakfast menu) and more of an everyday New York-style eatery. Wait staff are good-humored, and the See-burg Wall-o-Matic tableside jukeboxes actually work. Bring plenty of quarters. Breakfast all day; early-bird dinner specials; late-night dining. Open from 7 a.m. till midnight; until 2 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (5/03)

COTTAGE CAFE & GRODEN GRILL 2321 Fifth Avenue (at Juniper Street), Banker's Hill, 619-696-0071. The Polish feel of this midtown café is palpable. The owners vacation in Poland yearly to update the family recipes. But you can eat American if you want, with smidgeons of Russian, Italian, and Greek, too. The "Farmer's Breakfast" is a roundup of chopped ham or sausage, onions scrambled with two eggs, home fries, and toast. Or go Polish with a grilled Polish sausage sandwich stuffed with peppers, onions, and sauerkraut on rye. A full range of Polish specialties shows up on the weekend all-you-can-eat buffet, with stuffed cabbage, and chicken paprika. Try the Polish beer, "Okocim, 1845," but be careful—it's 8.1 percent alcohol. Great patio out back. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (9/01)*


ELAGAVE 2304 San Diego Avenue (at Old Town Avenue), Old Town, 619-220-0692. Reservations recommended. Wheelchair access difficult (steep ramp). You'll find upscale, unusual Mexican specialties in an intimate Spanish-style dining room or on a small heated balcony. The menu celebrates three great pre-Hispanic cuisines — Aztec, Mayan, Nahuatl with discreet admixtures of France, Spain, and Italy. (It's the history of Mexico on a plate.) Among the highlights are the five different Oaxacan moles (plus a sixth from Chiapas), Yucatecan-style venison, local sea bass utangy jamaica (hibiscus) sauce, and a unique appetizer, *tlacogos cuitlacoche*,

ovals of blue corn masa topped with a sort of "mushroom" that grows on corn ears. (In English it's called "corn smut," but it tastes much nicer than that sounds.) The bar stocks over 600 tequilas and makes a food-friendly onthe-rocks margarita with fresh fruit juices. Moderate. — N.W. (2/01)

EL FANDANGO 2734 Calhoun Street (next to Bazaar Del Mundo in the Plaza), Old Town Historic Park, 619-298-2860. This indoor-outdoor café sits right on the tourist-packed plaza. But come early, like 8 a.m., and you'll be practically alone. You're suddenly in a Mexican town, say 1840. Or-der up a chorizo (Mexican pork sausage) scrambled with eggs and rice and refried beans, or scrambled eggs mixed with *nopalitos* — cactus pads — and chile verde and frijoles, and maybe add breakfast champagne. Soon you'll be conjuring up all the fandangos dances — that happened here. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (12/01)

ELINDIO MEXICAN RESTAURANT 3695 India Street, midtown, 619-299-0333. El Indio, "the god of Mexican food," presides over this bustling (expect a line), airy restaurant in an atmosphere of pale blue 1940s so-lidity. The menu includes the usual suspects (burritos, tacos, etc.), plus slightly less common items (chicken mole, machaca, chile rellenos). Excellent house-made corn tortillas help the standard fare to better approximate the divine. So do the sublime core flavors of the meats - the chicken in the taco. the pork in the *carnitas verdes*, the beef in the enchiladas. The *carne asada* sports a pleasant char, and the beans have a raw-beany intensity. Less heavenly: seasonings (especially paprika and salt) tend toward the heavy side. Inexpensive. — A.M. (11/01)

GULF COAST GRILL 4130 Park Boulevard (between University and El Cajon), Hillcrest, 619-295-2244. The Gulf's faux-rustic, woodsy dining rooms and patio are great hangouts if you like a restaurant with a noisy party atmosphere. The menu focuses on the cuisine of the South and Southwest, with an emphasis on Louisiana and a heavy hand on the salt shaker. The kitchen does best with the straight Southern dishes, turning out divine fried soft-shelled crabs, airy hush pup-

pies, and delicious little corn muffins. If you're deeply familiar with Cajun-Creole flavors, though, don't look for pure authenticity — you'll do better with jambalaya, étouffée, or the lunchtime oyster po' boy than with the soulless gumbo or the misconceived red beans and rice. Heated, smokerfriendly front patio. Wheelchair eleva-tor to rest rooms next to stairs. Free parking lot left of the door. Full bar. Lunch Monday through Saturday, brunch Sunday, dinner nightly (early closing Sunday). Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

ICHIBAN 1449 University Avenue (at Normal), Hillcrest, 619-299-7203. Is this Paris or Tokyo? At night, the café outside glows like a Van Gogh painting, except the customers are eating sushi and drinking green tea, not red wine. The best values are at lunch, with week day specials like Bento combos (sushi rolls, crab, salmon, rice) and filling soups overflowing with veggies and thick udon noodles. Healthy? You betcha. The miso soup (with every dish) made from soy and seaweed is a great daily iodine fix. Number One that's what "ichi-ban" means. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. $-\dot{E}.B.$ (11/00)

KEMO SABE 3958 Fifth Avenue (off University Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-220-6802. Audacity is Chef Deborah Scott's culinary signature. In her cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touches and towering heaps of garnishes. All the ed-ible frou-frou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive *chilpotle* cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a picante mari nade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol fol-low the housestyle — sky-high, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Reservations strongly advised. Prices moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

LOTUS THAI 3761 Sixth Avenue (at Robinson Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-299-8272. Ironically, the best dishes at this idiosyncratic, veganfriendly Thai-Chinese restaurant involve char-grilled beef (e.g., *satay*, beef salad), featuring a very tender cut in a tangy marinade. From the long list of house specialties, try the lively pineap-ple-cashew fried rice, the chile-fierce "Crazy Duck" salad, or the savory (if slightly dry) "three-flavor" whole fried fish, accompanied by jammy garlicchile-fruit jam. Appetizers, though, are mainly greasy-fried wraps, and the vegetarian slant turns too many dishes bland (even when they're spicy), since the kitchen shuns Thailand's fish-based "secret sauce," nam pla. It doesn't help that the flesh components (shrimps, chicken, etc.) all taste like they've been parboiled in plain water and tossed into the pot at the last minute, with nothing left to give to or gain from the sauces — so if you crave soup or curry, you're best off with the elaborate vegetarian versions. Lunch and dinner daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/01) PRADO House of Hospitality, Balboa Park, 619-557-9441. In a magical space at the heart of Balboa Park, Prado features cute neo-Nouveau decor and a something-for-everyone menu of American-Mexican-Italian-with-Asian-touches cuisine. Despite the mixed ethnicities, the food brings few surprises, but is generally flavorful and served in huge portions. Top choices include meaty crab cakes, a refreshing eggplant "napoleon," and an astonish ingly tender, slow-roasted pork loin. A meringue-based banana Tres Leches cake is everyone's favorite dessert. The bar makes a nice stop during a mu-seum-crawl and offers ethereal fried oysters and a range of gussied-up mar-garitas. Dinner reservations vital. Interior is vast and prone to loudness, but heated, umbrella-topped terrace tables are quiet and scenic. Moderate to a little expensive, with reasonable wine list. -N.W. (12/00)

SHAKESPEARE PUB & GRILLE 3701 India Street, uptown, 619-299-0230. Probably the most convincing English pub in town. The Bard's brew-house boasts bare-board floors, diamond lead-glass windows, and authentic Brits sitting around the bar quaffing ale from their own pewter mugs. Pub grub is bluff and plain-spoken. Shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, ploughman's plate (the pickled onions and cheese, Scotch egg, and Branston pickle make it the real thing) — all are great with a pint of rich English beer, say a Boddington's Pub Ale. Sunday's roast beef dinner is worth dragging yourself out of bed for, too. The pub includes a shop that sells British goods. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/01)

TRATTORIA MAMMA ANNA AND **RISTORANTE** 228 Washington Street (at Albatross Street), Mission Hills, 619-220-7070. The food is Sicilian and the ambience is "neighborhood." "Mamma Anna" herself appears on and off at the eponymic restaurant, a popular Gaslamp spot before she retired and then, months later, revived

the restaurant two miles north. The cooking, too, is somewhat on-and-off, but the best dishes can be marvelous. Look for dishes with the fresh, clean marinara sauce and the homemade sausages, and save room for cheesecake. Dinner nightly. Moderate. N.W. (10/02)

DOWNTOWN

BANDAR FINE PERSIAN CUISINE 825 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-0101. The best Persian food in the city is prepared here. It's sensuous, low fat, and a blessing to the sight as well as the palate. Try stuffed grape leaves, yogurt, eggplant, charbroiled filet mignon, lamb, or chicken. Order all three kinds of rice. Enchanting interior, wonderful service. Not to be missed. Open daily, same menu lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. -EW

BAY CAFE 1050 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-595-1083. If you're hungry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsome bayview terrace (with no wheelchair access). After a chilly crossing, try the enjoyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced potatoes. The menu features breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches, variations on fish and chips including prawns, and chili dogs (all served with generic fries), plus some entrée salads. The burgers are genuinely "have it your way" — for a few extra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mushrooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). Open daily, breakfast to pre-dinner. Inexpensive. -N.W. (8/01)

CHIVE 558 Fourth Avenue (near Island Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-4483. Eating's an adventure at this coolly minimalist urban bistro where chef A.J. Dishes alternate between high-risk global fusion and stringently simple combinations that place outstanding ingredients (including free-range chicken and veal) at center stage, accompanied by a revelatory repertory of exotic vegetables. The worldwide wine list offers over 50 choices by the glass. Reserve for weekend dinners. when a chic young crowd pours in. Full bar. No cell phone use inside. Dinner nightly, with weekend service to 11:30 p.m. Expensive. — *N.W. (9/02)*

The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering; Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress or the spiffier side — some Hollywood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, upping the clothing curve. Dinner nightly Moderate-priced valet parking available. Moderate (simpler pastas) to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

DOWNTOWN FISH JOINT 407 C Street (at Fourth Avenue), downtown, 619-239-3506. Surprise: If you grab a shrimp taco at the Fish Joint and come sit outside at their sidewalk tables, you've found one of downtown's leastappreciated weekday lunch locations. With red trolleys, shady green trees, the old California Theater, and lunchtime foot traffic, the place feels positively swank. Most ask for fish and chips. But if "8 ounces of North Atlantic cod, 5-6 pieces" is too much, ask for the children's half-order. For a splurge, order the 8-ounce grilled salmon or the grilled seafood plate. Open weekdays, grilled seafood plate. Open weekdays, lunch Monday through Thursday, plus

FIO'S 801 Fifth Avenue (at F Street), Gaslamp, 619-234-3467. This hand some Gaslamp old-timer serves rich, comforting, serious North Italian cuisine in a civilized atmosphere, with the bar glassed off from the dining rooms, keeping the sound level low. Highquality ingredients (fine fresh fish, freerange chicken, genuinely ripe tomatoes, great Gorgonzola) are employed in well-executed dishes that are creative without going off the deep end. Great small details include fine bread with rosemary butter and an impressive wine list. There's plenty of life in this old girl yet. Full bar, heated patio. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. -N.W. (6/01)

GARGOYLE GALLERY & CAFE 1845 India Street (at Fir Street), Littly Italy, 619-234-1344. One of the hidden gems of Little Italy, but there's nothing Italian about it. The Moroccan decor with Turkish pillows, exotic lamps, tiles, inside tap fountain and a sunlit courtyard all combine to turn a meal here — even though it's mostly modest *panini* ("small bread") sandwiches — into a really sexy feast. Lots of kalamata olives, feta cheese, mozzarella, ham, and tomatoes. Try "The Moroccan" with grilled eggplant, zucchini, roasted red peppers, raisins, spicy garlic chili oil, and mixed greens. Or "The Spanish" with grilled chicken, manchego cheese, sliced olives, mixed greens, and aïoli. The breakfast menu includes two-egg *panini* with grilled zucchini, marinated peppers, feta cheese, and orange slices. A must-have: French pressed coffee, a two-cup glass pot with a steel plunger. Open daily for breakfast and lunch. Belly dancing, first Saturday of the month. — E.B. (5/02)

GRAND CENTRAL CAFE YMCA, 500 West Broadway (at India Street), downtown, 619-234-2233. A nice Broadway surprise — who'd expect the "Y" to have terrific meals? But Grand Central tries hard. The breakfasts are big and filling, and the lunch chili with salad and cheese toast is a tasty bargain. So is the veggie-burger with fries, coleslaw, soup, or salad. Plus you can look down onto Broadway and check when your boss is returning to work. Breakfast and lunch weekdays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

GYROSCOPE GREEK CAFE 926 Fifth Avenue (at E Street), Gaslamp, 619-235-4635. You want cheap *and* interesting food in the Gaslamp? Gyroscope's one of the few that make that list. They grind their own meats fresh daily, with beef and lamb on alternate days. (They're among the few to offer lamb *dolmades*.) The menu features the usual medium-priced kabobs, moussaka, *spanakopita*, tiger shrimps, and steak. But you can also get amply fill-ing "sandwich" size plates for just a few bucks: beef kabob, lamb, chicken breast, and of course the gyro (marinated lamb and beef slices in pita bread). Get one of these, a glass of burgundy, and a table with a view of the passing parade, and you'll be feeling like a king. Even cheaper at lunchtime Open daily, lunch and dinner, early dinner on Sundays. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (11/01)

MORTON'S OF CHICAGO 285 I Street, Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxuri-ous, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their Nebraska beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-

NUTTERS 428 C Street, Suite 101, downtown, 619-239-7075. They say the kid in you never dies. Find out here, where they have invented a zillion varieties of peanut butter applications to turn into lunch. Peanut butter sandwiches, peanut butter salads... First, decide which peanut butter: creamy, crunchy, or "natural style"? Then, what flavor? Super honey crunch? White chocolate? Carob? German chocolate? Cinnamon raisin? For a low-cost meal, try meat loaf and creamy mashed potatoes. Open for lunch Monday through Friday; dinner seven nights a week. Expensive. — E.W.

SPICE HOUSE CAFE 1401 Ninth Street (at Ash Street), downtown, 619-239-8510. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hangover Omelet. We don't know if it's the Or-tega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. The place is a pleasant surprise jutting out into the top foliage of trees sprouting up from Hwy. 163 — the view looks like a forest. Other excellent choices include Portuguese sausage with three eggs, paisano frittata with ham, toma-toes, mushrooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped cream. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Original branch at 9035 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Complex Drive, across from courthouse), 858-565-1028, also serves dinner nightly, with emphasis on Greek-American cuisine. Inexpensive. — E.B. CATHIE'S PLACE CAFE Sharp Coronado Hospital, 250 Prospect Place, Coronado, 619-522-3634. Cathie's may look like a hospital cafeteria. It certainly serves patients, doctors, employees, the retirement home across the road, and the visiting public. But this place is run by a Marriott spin-off. And what meals! Beef burgundy with stuffed potatoes and seasonal vegetables, plantation pork loin with fruit and nut chutney, baked fish with lemon sauce.... Breakfasts are forgettable — lunch and dinner are where it's at. The menu changes daily, but you can call ahead or ask Cathie (she's real and she's Scottish) to fax you the weekly "take-out dinner" menu. Weekdays only, breakfast to early dinner. DA KINE'S PLATE LUNCHES 1635 Sweetwater Road, National City, 619-477-8494. Also at 4120 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-274-8494. You go here for your Pacific Island fix — hundreds of Hawaiians do, every day. You'll find Hawaiian license plates and surfboards on the walls, "Aloha Maid" Guava Nec-tar, and island food. Although the kalua pig here isn't cooked in an imu — a hole in the ground — it sure tastes like the real thing and comes with cabbage, rice, macaroni salad, and kimchee. But beware of the *haupia* cake — it may cause serious addiction. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/00)

LYDIA'S CAFE AND NIGHTCLUB Palm Avenue, Nestor. 619-429-3603. This easygoing danc-619-429-3603. This easygoing danc-ing/eatery has a faithful following that goes back to 1957. But before you dance, eat! Check out the *birria en su jugo* (goat in its juices) with beans, rice, and tortillas, or enjoy filling snacks like *taquitos, cucaracha* (a corn tortilla stuffed with ham, cheese, and sour cream), or the snack Lydia says she in-vented: botanas (beans, pork, and melted cheese over corn chips). Open early to very late, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

PRIMAVERA 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454. This stand-out in Coronado's culinary scene offers courtly charm and an impressive menu. Try their saffron risotto, clams bordelaise, or the delicious ossobuco, of which every detail is accomplished, admirable. For dessert, have one of their excellent espressos and the tiramisu or lemon ricotta cake. Pri-mavera's accomplished staff takes unpretentious pride in their kitchen, the food and wine they serve, and right-fully so. Open daily. Expensive. — *M.N. (11/98)*

STRETCH'S CAFE 943 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-8886. Stretch got his name in World War II when he was 6'1" and 135 pounds. Now he wants to get back to that — and he wants you that way, too, so he serves strictly nuts and twigs. His menu in-cludes veggie salad, chicken breast and beans over brown rice, or a plate frankly named "Steamed Veggies," fea-turing carrots, zucchini, broccoli, mushrooms, and melted cheese on brown rice. You'll come out feeling so proud that you resisted the greasy Slamburger at Danny's bar next door. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

SUSHI SUSHI 600 Palm Avenue, Suit 300, Seacoast Plaza, Imperial Beach, 619-429-4373. Imperial Beach's only sushi bar really tries hard. With its pine sushi bar with roto-polished steel backboard, its white paper lanterns and pa per and wood screens, its water-rooted bamboo growing out in weird shape — it feels like you've been teleported to the Ginza. Even the dishes are little pieces of art. Cheap but delish choices include *katsudon* (breaded pork, onions and egg over rice) or *nabeyaki udon* (thick noodle soup with carrots, egg, chicken, fish cake and a side dish of deep-fried battered shrimp). Or tackle a combo *bento* tray (rice, soup, salad, plus two items from a list that includes squid teriyaki, gyoza, sashimi, and panko fried oysters). Or just go the "tapa" way, ordering sushi dishes one at a time. Your local honor-dish: the "I.B. Roll," filled with salmon egg, smelt egg, cream cheese, and avocado wrapped in salmon. Daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/02)

SWADDEE THAI 1001 C Avenue Coronado, (10th Street), Coronado, 619-435-8110. Tourists never stray to Swadee's quiet residential location a block from the bright lights of Orange Avenue. Their loss is the locals' gain. The dining room is a quiet, lovely haven from the hustle; the service is caring and gracious. Even if the long list of Siamese specialties is merely standard, the kitchen, too, is devoted to the art of gently giving pleasure. The peanut sauce accompanying the satay, for instance, is classically balanced; the complex but soothing coconut-chicken soup can wash away all cares; and the calamari in the many seafood arrays is cleverly knife-scored to achieve sheer tenderness along with good looks. Even the jasmine rice is an exceptionally fragrant brand. Unless you specify otherwise, spicy dishes have a nice nip tuned to brave but tender *farang* tastebuds. Inexpensive to moderate. N.W. TOMATOES PLUS: A CALIFORNIA **BISTRO** 4346 Bonita Road, Bonita, 619-479-8494. If you blink between the Baskin-Robbins and the market in the Bonita Center, you could miss this place. A mistake. Tomatoes charms you with an atmosphere somewhere be-tween mumsy and whimsy. And it bulges with dishes that are healthy but not preachy. This is not thinly disguised rabbit food — not with dishes like chicken and eggplant salad, which comes with delicious roast eggplant and chicken strips bathed in tingling chipotle (mesquite-smoked jalepeño) vinaigrette. Or chicken Florentine (breaded chicken breast with tomatoes — of course — plus spinach, cheese, and sautéed mushrooms. To use up more tomatoes, they have lotsa

pasta dishes too. And if you're feeling broke, the chili or clam chowder in an edible bread bowl will definitely fill you. Sunday champagne brunch usually has a surprise or two, and the everyday apple sausage omelet breakfast is a sweetavory treat. Breakfast through dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. -E.B. (4/02)

ACAMBARO Ave. Iturbide 580 (near Guadalupe Cathedral , between Juarez and calle 6), Ensenada, 646-176-5235. This friendly, family-run restaurant specializes in dishes of central Mexico. Breakfasts occupy half the menu, with lots of *huevos* cooked in various classic fashions - rancheros, Mexicanos, scrambled, or fried, with bacon or im-itation-Danola ham, plus *gringo* fa-vorites like hotcakes. The *chilaquiles con queso y crema* are especially tooth-some: perfectly crisped tortilla pieces (neither mushy nor chewy) swathed in vibrant green *tomatillo* sauce served with great, lardy beans. Open daily, three meals; breakfast served until 1 p.m. Very inexpensive. — *N.W. (4/03)*

BIG BOY RESTAURANT 9892 Agua Caliente Boulevard (across the street from the old bullring), Tijuana, 686-3788. Besides having excellent Mexican-American food, this Big Boy knock-off draws some of the most in-teresting people in Tijuana — journalists, lawyers, cattle ranchers, politicians, Baja's heavy hitters. Day or night, Big Boy is always busy. Gringo food's no problem. Breakfast includes eggs, ba-con, sausage, chorizo or ham, plus hash browns or frijoles, toast, juice, and endless coffee. Nobody will object if you sit sipping the free refills till the moon comes up. But you won't — you'll crack and order more when you smell the popular, macho "royal" hamburger, with two beef patties, smoked ham, onions, lettuce, tomatoes, fries, and salad. Or the chicken breast marinated in tequila with cilantro, gua-camole, and beans. Open 24/7. Inex-pensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

CAFE LA ESPECIAL 718 Avenida Rev-olución (down the market steps), Ti-juana, 685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American afi-cionados of Tijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros. Sum-mer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-togringos ratio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to *carne asada* and *bistek ranchero*, from cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the steamed taco stand upstairs. That's still going too. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (5/02)

CIEN ANOS Calle Jose Maria Velazco #1407, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-3039 or 634-7262, altacocina@cien-a.com. This lovely, comfortable, dressy-casual "destination restaurant" serves extraordi-nary Mexican haute cuisine, graced with a brilliant variety of sauces based on elaborations of Mexican ingredi-ents, including tropical fruits, nuts, and above all a vast variety of chile peppers, each with its own distinctive flavor (not all of them spicy). You could eat here a dozen times and not begin to exhaust the possibilities. Just a few of the treats are mushrooms steeped in beef mar-row, alligator meat mini-tacos, *pozole* with crab meat, and an irresistible beef and shrimp stew. (Food critic Ruth Re-ichl consumed a meal of exotic Aztec delicacies, including ant roe and mez-cal worms, and you can try them too when they're in season.) The wine list is devoted wholly to ambitious Baja wineries; you're also welcome to BYO. Bar choices include damiana and hibiscus liqueurs. Menu and staff are bilingual. Reservations (phone or e-





Crisp quail with rose petal sauce (famed from *Like Water for Chocolate*) proves outrageously delicious, and *chiles en nogada* (meat-stuffed poblano chiles with walnut-cream and pomegranate) gain refinement from greaseless ground sirloin. Fish dishes are fresh, rich, and tender, and you'll find nine different ways to enjoy a steak. If you can handle a tableside production number, crepes with *cajeta* (caramel sauce) makes a very grand finale. Fully bilingual staff; English menus available. Sidewalk patio dining available. Reserve for weekends during tourist peaks. Full bar, with excellent margaritas, Baja wines. Open daily, continuous service breakfast through dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

It's hard to imagine a better start to the day, in any sweeter ambiance, than at La Fonda ("The Inn"), which offers Mexican and American breakfast dishes and a lavish Sunday brunch buffet with both. Arrive early for patio seating under a straw umbrella with a full-out ocean view. The bilingual menu is written on chalkboards and dinner choices change nightly, featuring American and Mexican seafood entrées and deluxe meats aged in-house. Most staffers speak some English. Full bar, including Baja-grown wines. Open daily, three meals, starting about 9 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate; cash only. — *N.W. (4/03)*

MALECON DE PUERTO NUEVO Northwest edge of Puerto Nuevo; take Calle Entrada (entry road) to the ocean-front bluff, edge right, and walk about 30 feet down a steep dirt road running seaward from the street-market on the oceanside edge of town. Look for a yellow building with blue trim and a terrace with umbrellas Worth looking for. This great, honest little restaurant harks back to the original, uncommercialized "lobster village" before it got its capital letters and written menus. Open since August, 2002, it's owned by an active fisher-man, who serves (as much as weather permits) fresh-caught local lobsters and genuine "daily catch" with standard sides — superb frijoles, red rice, real melted butter — and that's all. The first-course ceviche, when available, is astonishingly flavorful with fish caught that very morning; in harsher weather, a hearty, warming fish chowder substitutes. Everyone's well-dressed, with lots of ties and careful make-up (not on the same person). Several concessions, including Tortas y Burritos Tonka, Armando's, and Panaderia Diego deliver cheap, standard Amero-Mexican. But come for the sound of 600 people like you, all chatting like crazy (in Spanish). Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Two Beverly Hills lawyers started this chain in 1985 to exploit "the premium pizza segment." Some 150 restaurants later, guess it worked. The place is all shiny chrome, glass, etched palm trees, golden wood and black furniture, and two pizza ovens with real logs burning inside. The Original BBQ chicken pizza, the chain's first hit, is still their top seller. It has barbecue sauce, smoked Gouda and mozzarella cheeses, BBQ chicken, red onions, and cilantro. The BBQ chicken chopped salad is good too, as is the jambalaya. If you've got a sweet tooth, but are embarrassed to order "Hawaiian" pizza, try the pear and Gorgonzola. It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions, Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. At night, the Nobel Drive branch features a view of the shining Mormon cathedral. D'LISH PIZZA AND PASTA 2470 San Diego Avenue, Old Town, 619-296-6969. Here in Old Town, at least, D'Lish gets a lot of custom from people who are Mex'd out, foodwise. This growing chain has always prided itself on its Italian/California pastas. pizzas, and salads. Now Old Town (along with Poway) has gone carniv-orous, adding marinated flank steak and a rib eye to the "bistro entrées." If you're ordering the flank, well-done is a no-no. That will toughen it. But a rare flank is, well, d'lish in its marination and especially its pesto-like chimichurri sauce. Also good: fireroasted vegetables pizza, where the quick roasting makes for great-tast-ing, Technicolor-bright broccoli, zucchini, eggplant, and bell peppers. And "Mediterranean chicken salad" works well, partly thanks to the tang of pepperoni chips. A big part of the appeal of the Old Town D'Lish branch is the charming patio it occupies, with gas lamps, hanging flowers, and a foun-tain. One tasty starter is "crabioli," fried wonton stuffed with crab and melted cream cheese ("crab Rangoon" by another name, but smoother). You can choose buckets of steamed, barbecued, or garlic crab (of various subspecies), or go for fried or grilled seafood or steaks, or salads. A Mighty Wind — Christopher Guest and his repertory group turn their "mockumentary" style - a style of expedience at best - to a reunion of Sixties folkies for a live concert on public television. LEAD STORIES

- While two co-appellants chose to have lawyers represent them before the Supreme Court of Canada in their challenge of their marijuana convictions, David Malmo-Levine spoke for himself, addressing the justices for 40 minutes on May 6, arguing that his right of "substance orientation" was similar to someone's right of sexual orientation. After his session (which he began by waving hello to the justices), Malmo-Levine revealed that his entire courtroom wardrobe was made of hemp and that he had taken a few hits of hashish beforehand. Said he, "I was happy, hungry, and relaxed, but I was not impaired.'

 The annual World Pole-Sitting Championships began May 1 in Berlin, and if the winner is decided after November 17, he will have a new world record. Contestants sit on a 15inch-by-23-inch platform 24 hours a day, and electronic sensors detect if anyone leaves the platform for any reason except for the ten-minute break every two hours. The event's organizer said the Dutch are the sport's "purists," that in Dutch competitions, "you don't get to sit on a board, and you can't come down [for restroom breaks].'

The Things People Believe

- A juror in the recent London trial in which five Irish car-bombers were convicted was let go by the judge for inattention because she carried out spiritual rituals in the jury box while clutching a witchcraft book in one hand and placing the other, as required by the ritual, on the floor. ... In York, Pa., the trial is nearing for Matthew Turner, 22, who was arrested last year after pursuing a man for his adrenal gland, which he thought would bring a weeklong high if licked or eaten; allegedly, he had stabbed the man in the side, and when the man escaped, Turner chased him through town, knife drawn, until police caught him.

Compelling Explanations

- In April, when the Republicans on the New York City Board of Elections killed a plan to repair voting machines that had underrecorded votes in the 2000 election (with most of the unlucky voters being Democrats), Republican

commissioner Stephen Weiner denied that his party's disinterest in properly functioning machines showed bias against Democrats: "There are some people who don't want [their vote] register[ed], but who report to the polls for civic reasons.' - Some illegal immigrants from Mexico choose to enter the United States through a desolate mountain-desert area east of Yuma, Ariz., but in May 2001, 14 of them died of dehydration. In April 2003, their families filed a \$42 million lawsuit in Tucson against the U.S. Interior Department for having failed to install water stations in the area.

 At a May court appearance in Melbourne, Australia, to answer charges of unsanitary food at his Raiah Sahib Tavern and Tandoori Grill, Larry Mendonca denied that the moldy items that inspectors found were part of his restaurant's fare. Moldy relish and eight-year-old pickles? Mendonca said they were his personal foods, not the restaurant's. A bowl of chilis topped with mold? His. A moldy jug of salad dressing? His. Besides, he said, "It was scum, not mold."

- Responding to a February incident in St. Clair Shores, Mich., in which a girl performed oral sex on a boy during a middle-school class (both were suspended), the superintendent and the principal wrote to parents: "Just like our country was shocked into awareness when neverbefore acts of terrorism occurred in New York City, our district was shocked into awareness when middle-school students engaged in indecent acts in the classroom." The boy's parents filed a lawsuit over the suspension, pointing out that their son was a "victim" in that, when the girl started, he had no "legal duty" to resist.

 Pennsylvania's attorney general and prosecutors in Arapahoe County, Colo., made similar interpretations of child pornography laws recently in defending their decisions not to reveal information. The attorney general said he could not publicly identify websites he had ordered suppressed by Internet service providers because to identify those sites would be "disseminating" child pornography. And the Colorado prosecutors refused to show defendant Joseph Verbrugge the 200 photographs it would use against him (as is required in all criminal cases) because to do so would be to disseminate child pornography

People Different From Us

- Convicted killer Roderick Ferrell, 23, asked for a new trial in March, telling a judge in Tavares, Fla., that he had had an inadequate defense at his 1996 murder trial. Ferrell had admitted then that he was the leader of a teenaged, goth-outfitted "vampire clan" that often cut their arms open to suck each other's blood and which murdered the parents of one of its members. Ferrell told the judge this time that he had been seeing a psychiatrist in 1996, whereupon the judge asked who had originally told him he needed help; Ferrell replied, "The school, the sheriff's office, my mom. Basically the whole city.'

Recurring Themes

- Cat-hoarder Heidi Erickson, 42, had two Boston-area homes raided in April and May, at which authorities rescued a total of 112 sickly cats and found several cat carcasses. Erickson is one of the more aggressive hoarders on record, both for her proclivity for litigiousness (40 cases in seven years) and the circus-like atmosphere she created at a subsequent court hearing (during which she denied the accounts of numerous witnesses that the cats were ailing). She told one person her mission was to breed the "imperfections" out of Persians. Erickson said she was a victim of discrimination (epileptic disability, sexual lifestyle) and would challenge any eviction or any restrictions by authorities in Beacon Hill and Watertown, Mass.

Masters of Disguise

- A man escaped in February after robbing a Wienerschnitzel drive-thru in North Long Beach, Calif. Identifying him was difficult because he had smeared what appeared to be chocolate pudding over his face. ... Edwin Lockhart, 48, received a ten-year sentence in April for robbing a Sun Trust bank in Palatka, Fla. He was identified despite having stuck several sanitary napkins onto his face.



It had seemed like a dream. Had I visited a place, a real place, called South Park?

Nothing like a stroll about the neighborhood on a fine spring evening. That's what I would have called it, a strollabout, since that is more precisely what I was doing. Strolling. I will leave the finer definitions of walking, strolling, sauntering, trundling, etc., for another time, but trust me, actual walking around South Park is soon at an end, and one must either stroll, saunter, or come to a rest. Still it is good to know that one can perform these activities at all in an area of the San Diego map I have been suspicious about acknowledging as real at all. I am now somewhat more persuaded as to its existence, but far from convinced. Still, let's just say it is a pleasant conceit to indulge in (...strolling through South Park one day, in the merry, merry month of May...). And I enjoyed myself thoroughly, pretending the neighborhood, its denizens and merchants, the jugglers and the clowns (well, the jugglers), were all as real as people in North Park or Golden Hill.

The #2 bus leaves us next to the official South Park sign in front of the Whistle Stop bar, a Fern Street pub so adorable it produced a frisson of nostalgia for my drinking days. "South Park's Spring Walkabout," a flyer reads. "Area stores open late with specials." Mmm. "Refreshments and entertainment served up at participating stores.... Walkabout after-party at the Whistle Stop with a live band."

Coffee at Rebecca's is a good move: strong, dark, maybe a French roast. I pick up the VHS of The End of the Affair for \$3 and read the back of the thing at a table outside, watching local joggers take back the night. The number of golden retrievers on leashes pushes

the triple digits — a number beyond coincidence (does the chamber of commerce supply them to new residents?). The coffee complements my illicit and cheap cigar with a poignancy that would bring tears to the eyes of a Brooklyn bookie. My doctor must never know.

Rebecca Zeering is a hardworking woman. Good coffee is not the only thing on her mind (she will only buy from San Diego suppliers). She works a full-time job before coming in to bake items that not only look very good but taste insanely good. I have a brief fantasy that involves hired thugs in the employ of my electrophysiologist (pacemaker guy) tackling me around the knees — one goes for the smoldering Grenadier, the other for the pastry lifted to my face. I snap out of it and notice Zeering is speaking to me.

"We're going on 12 years," she says. "I started with a partner, but he's got his own place in Imperial Beach now."

"So you were here before this was South Park?"

"Yeah. Some people want to call it that. I guess [the name] exists on some early maps or something. But originally, everyone will tell you, including the police, that the middle of the street is the boundary between North Park and Golden Hill. Now they're saying Golden Hill is more over the hill. I guess South Park sounds better. You started hearing it about three years ago.

"It's really changed from when I first got here. Tons of gangs and stuff. I remember there was a gunfight at that house there." She gestures toward the corner. We are sitting on a wooden sidewalk in front of Rebecca's, and for a moment we are in the Old West. "Bullets were flying and stuff like that. Gang kids. It's so different now. Anyway, I still like saying Golden Hill. To me it seems like a financial division maybe - like you want to sound better. To me it's always Golden Hill. South Park sounds like that cartoon."

I mention that these few blocks remind me of certain sections of Brooklyn (I guess the cigar and the coffee are yanking me back there from the Old West), back in the late '70s, as they were on the brink of gentrification, fashion, and fabulosity. "Park Slope," Zeering nails the exact neighborhood I'm thinking of, and we're off talking about Brooklyn.

Across the street at Clarity Soaps & Candles, where many candles are at least half recycled wax (bring in your old candles and get a free bag of potpourri), proprietor Peggy Orr-Hill is serving margaritas to her customers from a blender back there by the cash register. "We've been here for two and a half years," she says, meaning this location.

"How would you define South Park?" I meant, I suppose, where exactly is it?

"Oh, friendly. Very supportive. A warm, wonderful neighborhood. This little neck of the woods has truly become South Park."

I was thinking of Brooklyn again and the Italian neighborhood I lived in. For decades it was Red Hook, and then some real estate agents got together and decided it was Carroll Gardens. Sounded less bloody, I suppose. But it confused the hell out of the old-timers, who wondered where Red Hook went.

Strolling on, we pass Mazara Pizza, which has always done a pretty solid trade, no matter what the neighborhood was called. My companion wants to visit her friend George at My Back Yard. The nursery, art, and garden center and its next-door neighbor, Champagne Taste, are lit up and visible from two blocks away. Teenaged jugglers toss pins and flaming torches in the air for a crowd gathered on the sidewalks.

George Billingsley Jr. is behind much of the neighborhood rally bringing the area around 30th and Juniper into a new light called South Park. The proprietor has fought many of the early battles involved with neighborhood renovation

without the help of "any government assistance or grants. This is what we believe in; this is what we're gonna do." This knack (aside from his green thumb and botanical powers) earned him the pinkish rubric of "Fuschia King" among his friends, neighbors, and fellow merchants. Billingsley can fill you in on such historical footnotes as the site of the original Safeway in San Diego just down the road and other bits of interest.

"Everybody went into their pockets, and everybody put their necks on the line," he says, "and I think tonight is a great salute to what we've been doing. We have these Walkabouts four times a year. The biggest one is over the holidays. But great things are happening. Great things.'


