baritone king of disco who died in Los Angeles last week at the age of 58 of complications from high blood pressure, lived for awhile with his girlfriend and various children in a bayside mansion right around the corner from Point Loma's San

Diego Yacht Club. Adorned in black-satin suits and gold chains, the soul singer of such lines as "Take off that brassiere, my dear/ Don't wear no panties," ensconced himself in an elaborate Scott Street residence custom built in the 1980s by the late Robert Oscar Peterson, founder of the Jack in the Box hamburger chain and husband of onetime San Diego mayor Maureen O'Connor. Mega-millionaire Peterson had constructed the house as a bachelor's quarters during a brief marital tiff with O'Connor. White, the so-called Walrus of Love, started out as a poor boy in a Galveston, Texas, Baptist church choir before graduating to superstar status, making millions from a chain of '70s hits including "I'm Gonna Love You Just a Little More, Baby," "Can't Get Enough of Your Love, Babe," and "You're the First, the Last, My Everything." Always the master of excess, White ultimately married twice and had at least one longtime mistress, Katherine Denton, who lived with him here and by whom he had a daughter Barriana, his eighth child. U.S.A. Today reported last November that White once commissioned San Diego's West Coast Aquarium Industries to build an acrylic dining room table so that dinner guests could look down and watch his exotic fish swimming inside. A reporter for London's Sunday Telegraph, granted rare access to the house by White back in 1999, wrote last week, "It was an intimidating place, in which everything, except myself, was decorated in black and gold. There were lilies draped with gold tinsel; there was a jet-black swimming pool flanking one side of the reception room; and — through a door that had been left slightly ajar - I saw a vast black-and-gold bed." She added, "White was an immensely courteous host. He plied me with sweet, Lebanese cakes (brought in on a gold plate by his son, Kevin); he invited me to touch his Steinway piano ('Feel it, sweetheart. It feels good'); and he frequently interrupted me to announce in a deep, syrupy baritone: 'I like your questions, baby.'

Cheetahs redux That friendly female cheetah in the new Chargers TV spot, seemingly poking fun at the city council's strip-club travails, was lent to the team by the San Diego



Zoo. The cat,

born at the Columbus Zoo, is one of the zoo's "animal ambassadors" and travels with her own canine companion ... San Diego school-district officials are said to still be investigating that alleged kickback scheme involving a Macintosh computer dealer from Oregon and an unidentified district employee. A year ago this August, KGTV Channel 10 reported that police in Eugene, Oregon, raided Mac Exchange, carting out hard drives and other evidence in the probe. A police spokeswoman there told reporters that San Diego Unified School District police had obtained a warrant and requested the action. Warrants were also served on the company's Temecula office and the employee's home. That was about the last time anything regarding the investigation has been mentioned in public ... Ex-San Diego police chief Bob Burgreen — who retired in 1993 only to become head of cops in Longview, Washington, three years later — is in the running to be acting police chief of Tacoma, Washington. Burgreen is set to be interviewed tomorrow by the department, which is filling the seat of David Brame, who murdered his wife and then committed suicide in April.



San Diego has heard that twice before. There was the remake of what is now Qualcomm, with the purportedly wondrous 60,000-seat guarantee, and then the ballpark, which was to be financed by taxes thrown off by commercial structures, particularly hotels, that are nowhere in sight.

The new Chargers proposal will definitely drain city funds; the question is how it will be covered up. Watch for several things: the team will try to wiggle out of \$150 million in rent owed for the next 16 years; the team will get the land virtually free from the city; promises will be neither memorialized nor enforced; there will be a promise of a luscious public park; and the city and team will claim the deal doesn't impact the general fund, which will be deceitfully defined.

Another distinct possibility: the Chargers will want to lose a 2006 vote, so they can leave town claiming they were shoved.

With a hide-the-pea government and a perfume-thepolecat mainstream media, discovering the deceptions will be difficult, as in the past.

Examples abound: in May of 1995, then-city manager Jack McGrory assured the city council in a memo that under the agreement with the Chargers, the seats would fill up. The San Diego International Sports Council, one of those charmed institutions that takes government funds so it can turn around and lobby government, promised it would work to "increase continued on page 6

We Don't **Want Anyone** to Surf Here

hen a stranger showed up with his surfboard at the Windansea surf break last December, the locals knew he was

a troublemaker. "He was a biker-surfer

type," said Mark Dephilippis, a 43-year-old Windansea local who was watching the waves from the parking lot. "He had a bad attitude." Sitting in the lineup berassing the local kids -"screaming at them and talking about their mothers," said Dephilippis. "Enough is enough," De-

philippis said. "We take care of our own."

A local shot his board at



yond the breakers, all that can be heard is the slap of the sea on the sides of the surf boards. On this day in December, the locals were watching the visitor and readying themselves for a fight. The visitor began hathe visitor, using the momentum from a wave to propel it toward his head. The board missed the man, and the visitor began to paddle to the shore.

But the locals followed him. On the beach, the man

began to run. Four locals caught up with him and beat him. There was no contest. "I'd have ripped his head off," said Dephilippis. By the end of the fight, the visitor was bloody and beaten, with part of his ear missing. It was bitten off in the rumble.

When the police arrived, neither the bloody visitor nor the bloody local pressed charges.

"He knew he was dead wrong," said Dephilippis, adding, "we're not backing down."

This recent eruption of violence at Windansea is part of the tradition of surfing. Last summer, a group of locals yelled at and threatened young surfers who had entered a competition at the Ocean Beach Pier. "That was pretty bad," said 13-year-old Josh Cormin, a Windansea surfer. Three years ago, a San Diego local held a visiting surfer submerged underwater for over 30 seconds, a maneuver known as dunking. Nearly six years ago, an off-duty lifeguard was beaten by a local at the Sunset Cliffs surf spot known as Garbage. Because these incidents occur out of the purview of city police, few are officially recorded. Word passes from mouth to mouth; surfers know which spots are "localized."

Surfing websites, which offer information on surf



spots around the world, rate the level of localism as they would other dangers. "Risk of rip currents: high. Risk of locals: high."

Beaconsbeach.com, a website dedicated to the local Encinitas surf spot, says that the group of surfers known as the "Grandview Tribe" are "known for their fierce localism and protective nature of their beach." The site says that the Grandview Tribe "specializes in stealth techniques to prevent exposure of their beach to the outside world." Farther north, Wannasurf.com warns nonlocals away from 40th Street, a popular break in Orange County, by saying "localism is VERY heavy here ... there

isn't a lot of respect, even between seasoned locals. Don't even try to ride the left at the jetty unless you grew up here."

"When I was a kid, I was taught to fight anyone," said Ozstar DeJourday, La Jolla local and former president of the Windansea Surf Club. "That's the way we were brought up — to fight. We were beat up at 11 years old by guys 18 or 19 years old." 'These kids will do the

same stuff," said 32-year-old Gabe Jensen, a La Jolla resident and Windansea local. "When I was in my teens, I looked forward to that kind of stuff," he said.

Now "it's like a family," Jensen said. "It takes a long

time to get that." Jensen is unapologetic about the occasional eruption of violence at the beaches. A surfer who does not respect his elders has to expect it, he said. It is part of the code of surfing. Should violent localism continue? "Absolutely," Jensen said.

"If you don't live here, don't surf here," declares one bold sign written on the boulders just south of Swami's. "Locals only," says another, also south of Swami's, written as a welcome sign on the decaying concrete pilaster of what was once a lifeguard tower. Many of these signs are written in surf wax. The letters are yelcontinued on page 13

and the Chargers would also determine schedule dates. To anyone who had read the contract, it was clear that it was a pre-plotted ploy: the Padres could say the city had forced them out, and they needed a new facility. But McGrory's

May 1995 memo projected that the Padres would continue generating big bucks for the city at what was then Jack Murphy Stadium. Indeed, by 2010, the Padres playing at the Murph would shovel \$7.7 mil-

lion to the city. Ulp! "Anybody who operated in 1995 on the assumption that the Padres intended to con-

tinue playing at Jack Murphy Stadium after 1999 simply had not read the agreement," says former councilmember Bruce Henderson

In 1997, John Witt, who was city attorney when the Chargers' contract was drawn, said that Mayor Susan Golding was the city's chief negotiator, and the city attorney's office played a limited role. Shortly, Witt did a mea maxima culpa. "I screwed up," he claimed. Golding was not the chief negotiator. Witt sud-

denly recalled being briefed almost daily on the negotiations. It is amazing how heads clear when a guillotine hangs over them.

Recently, there has been the question of the so-called trigger - a financial thresh-

amount they suck out of city governments. Councilmember Donna Frve hired a nationally known economist who said the Chargers could not trigger. The city ignored the economist and began negotiating with the team without saying whether the Chargers could trigger. "They adopted a policy of negotiating a new contract in secret without determining if they were required to negotiate a contract," says attorney Mike Aguirre.

"From the beginning, I opposed entering into negotiations unless the Chargers proved they could trigger," says Frye. "My position has not changed." She is annoved by the government-imposed omertá. "The Chargers are allowed to speak about their proposal. Why can't I?" In dealing with the city on sports issues, Frye says, "It is difficult to get straight answers" from bureaucrats.

In the 1995 agreement, the Chargers pledged to use their "best efforts" to fill the stadium. But after several years of lousy attendance and a big drain on city coffers from the seat guarantee, the Chargers raised ticket prices, and city attorney Casey Gwinn didn't exercise the best-efforts clause He should have done so long ago to force the Chargers to lower prices, says Henderson.

The Padres provide a more nauseating example of government obsequiousness and disingenuousness. Gwinn claimed in the ballot argument that the project would be "revenue neutral" because of the bounteous tax revenue flowing from hotels, office, and retail buildings. When it was obvious the tax receipts would fall far short, a new mayor, Dick Murphy, made wholesale alterations to the deal. The memorandum of understanding, the document authorizing the project, had declared that if there were "material changes," it would have to go back to the voters. Gwinn kicked the matter to the council, which said there were no material changes.

The memorandum of understanding gave the Padres the right to "fine-tune" the mix of real estate in the ballpark district. Former law professor and judge Robert Simmons pointed out in a lawsuit that, for just one example, the requirement for office build-

ings had been lessened by 66 percent. That was hardly finetuning. But the city insisted it was

"'Fine-tuning' was a code word for 'We can do whatever we want," says Stanley Zubel, Simmons's attorney.

Now the Padres and the city — and the mainstream press that has an economic interest in pro-sports subsidies - are crowing that there is a condominium boom in and around the ballpark district. This is laughable. The taxes generated by residential real estate barely pay for the infrastructure and services the homes require. "There are no sales and transient occupancy [hotel] taxes from residences," says Zubel.

"Housing is a drain," says Frye, citing many studies. Transient-occupancy taxes provide the city with juicy revenue, notes Henderson, but there has been little hotel construction in the ballpark district.

Recently, of course, there was the question of the 3.5acre "park at the park" that, Aguirre points out, the Padres touted in a mass mailing to the citizenry before the 1998 vote. But when the Padres wanted to shrink the park substantially, the city attorney's office said that the memorandum of understanding had deliberately not spelled out the specifics for the park, lest economic conditions change. Indeed, the Padres had shrunk the size back in 1999 by quietly showing another rendering. Also, the ballpark itself is no longer positioned to give the fans great views, as originally advertised. And this is the city attorney's office that is supposed to be prosecuting bait-and-switch schemes.

Overall, "If you look at the contract, there was no penalty clause" for Padres nonperformance, says Henderson. The contract should have read, "If for some reason the promised buildings are not on the tax rolls, you pay the city the shortfall. All the city attorney did was memorialize what the city was going to do, and in vague terms memorialized what the Padres might do if they were so inclined." Great contract.

The city attorney's office wouldn't answer questions

about all these matters. Now, presumably, there will be a new Chargers contract. It will be filled with loopholes that are sure to drain your pocketbook, but your problem will be finding out how.

a frenzy," said Dennis Kinzer, a 47-year-old Carlsbad resident and lifetime surfer.

If you surf long enough in one place, the locals will give you a name, a surf name - like Winter, Weasel, Red Dog, the Cave Man, and

Silent Mike. After a day of surfing, locals will congregate in parking lots or on the beach.

"We are the council," said one surfer standing with two of his friends in the parking lot above Swami's, who identified himself only by his surf name, Durell. "We are like a family.... We don't want anyone to surf here."

Standing in the parking lot at Swami's, their hair still wet from the ocean, the continued on page 14

continued from page 13 group watched every car closely as it pulled slowly round the drive. If they didn't like the look of the car, or if they saw more than two people checking out the surf, they would start heckling and yelling at the car. It wasn't hostile yelling, just a gentle reminder to the visitors that they were on "council" turf. "If people pull in from Florida and try to take the same waves as you, it's like, come on, we've been waiting for these," Durell said.

"It wasn't this crowded a couple of years ago," said Weasel. "It's getting more and more crowded every year. On a good day, you can see 100 or 150 people out there."

On California's 1100 miles of coastline, there are 648 well-known surf spots, according to the Surfrider's annual "State of the Beach" report. There are 73 wellknown breaks from Oceanside to Coronado — including Tamarack, Seaside Reef, Bird Rock, and Garbage and dozens more unnamed "secret spots."

There are estimated to be more than four million surfers worldwide and more than 800,000 in California alone. Seeing more than 100 people at any one break is an experience most surfers share.

Clint Warner, an Ocean Beach surfer who learned to deal with locals living in Hawaii, brings a screwdriver when he's surfing a new spot. Before he paddles out, he slams the screwdriver into a wooden pole, or into the ground, to show the locals "I have an attitude." Warner said that he's never had a problem in San Diego.

The most heavily localized of all the San Diego surf spots are the breaks that have not become overcrowded. Once the number of surfers exceeds a certain level — say, an average of 30 on a bigsurf day — localism fades away. There are simply too many new surfers to intimidate, too many people to chase away. Breaks like Black's Beach and the Ocean Beach Jetty, though once heavily localized, are now open to anybody.

But spots like Windansea and the difficult-to-reach Newbreak south of Ocean Beach are still disputed. The locals still feel as if they need to protect their turf.

Locals are upset by more than just the crowds. Most violent localism "has to do with people who are in over their heads, and they are a danger to themselves and others," said Jim Neri, a 43year-old La Jolla resident and lifetime surfer. "They are being told, 'Go surf somewhere you can learn.' "

"A lot of people paddle out and think they can just drop in because they can stand up," said Chip, a Cardiff local and lifetime surfer. But beginners don't know the rules of the wave — that a surfer must respect the elders and follow the wave etiquette. "There is a pecking order," Chip said, "that beginners don't understand."

"The person closest to the peak has the wave," said Jim Neri. "It should be common sense. The person in front should either pull back or kick out. And there should be respect out there. If you paddle out at a new place, you wait for the pack to *continued on page 18*

continued from page 14 catch their wave." Surfers who don't follow the rules are "a real danger to themselves and to others."

San Diego lifeguard lieu-

tenant Brent Bass said that the lifeguards receive many more calls to treat surfingrelated injuries than to respond to harassment by locals. "We see a lot of head injuries and facial lacerations," Bass said. "Usually what gets hit is what is sticking out of

the water, and that is your head. The leash on the board acts like a big rubber band, and the board gets traveling really fast."

As violent as it can sometimes be, "[localism] is also beneficial," said Matt Walker, editor at Surfing magazine.

Locals keep an eye on their own beach, using their trained aggression — the crowding, heckling, and intimidation — to make sure beginners don't get in over their heads and saving them when they do.

"A lot of good things

come out of [the localism at] Windansea," said Dephilippis. "We organize surf contests for the kids...we sponsor beach cleanups," he said. "I don't want you to think that every time you come down to Windansea you'll get beat up, because that's






Talking Trash, Part II

Fish or Cut Bait

ask, "How long has it been like this?"

"I don't know. For a number of years they've been monitoring mercury in some of these larger predatory fish - like tunas and sharks and swordfish — because they are at the top of the food chain and are capable of accumulating mercury above the levels of concern, around the one-part-permillion range.'

Speaking is David Parker, senior biologist for the California Department of Fish and Game/Marine Region/Los Alamitos Office and Laboratory. I'm seeking an answer to the question, "How bad is it?" It being water pollution so foul the Food and Drug Administration recommended that pregnant women avoid eating shark, swordfish, king mackerel, tile fish, and ocean whitefish. This is but a tap on the shoulder compared to the Environmental Protection Agency, which "issued a national advisory recommending that women who are pregnant or may become pregnant, nursing mothers, and young children limit their consumption of freshwater fish caught by friends and family to one meal per week (6 oz. cooked for adults, 2 oz. cooked for children)."

Note that women who "may become pregnant" is any female from, roughly, 12 years old to the age of 45. And "freshwater fish caught by friends and family," means any catch by any civilian/recreational fisherperson fishing in these United States.

Getting back to Parker, I ask him what he does and how long has he been at it. Parker replies that he's been working for Fish and Game "a little over 30 years. We monitor and manage our recreational and commercial fisheries here in Southern California. We determine the health of the stocks, how much can or can't be caught. where and when...those kinds of things.

This is the man I've been looking for. "When you consider the FDA issued a warning about multiple species of fish, fish that travel hither and yon, thousands of miles, it causes me to think mercury pollution is very, very bad and it's everywhere.

Parker has a pleasant-sounding, albeit dispassionate voice. "Well, it's not 100 percent certain what the exact source of this mercury is. There are sources that are due to pollution, but there are also natural sources of mercury. I'm not certain if they know for sure - especially with these wide-ranging fish - where the mercury is coming from.

"So, there could have been the same mercury readings in fish 50 years ago?'

"I don't know."

I'm snapped awake by an honest answer. "How about freshwater fish in California?"

"Well, there are some freshwater lakes that have mercury warnings due to natural mercury in the surrounding soils and geological formations. Lake Berryessa and Clear Lake, up north, are a couple that have advisories on limiting consumption of fish because of the mercury levels in the fish. And, of course, there have been instances where, due to mining operations, mercury has gotten into the surface waters as well."

Sounds pretty routine, even soothing. "What about the average fisherman? He drives up to the Sierra Nevadas, parks, walks in for a few miles, and starts fishing. Is that dangerous?"

"You would assume," Parker says, "that in some backcountry lake there wouldn't be much of a pollution problem, but you don't know for sure unless it's been sampled, and many of those waters haven't been sampled."

Sounding a little less routine. "How about farming and pesticides?"

Runoff from farm operations has been shown to contain various chemicals that are used in farming." Duh. "Does that mean you wouldn't fish in

the San Joaquin River?"

"I don't know of any health advisories that have been issued there," says Parker. "You can probably go anywhere and find some level of contamination. It's a matter of 'What is the level? What is the risk?' Generally, with respect to Southern California, there's no place that doesn't have some level of contamination from some chemicals or compounds.

I have this quite unpleasant feeling that things are much worse than I assumed they were, way back in May of 2003. "The population of California has doubled since your first day on the job. How is water pollution now as compared

to then?'

"Well," Parker says, "my understanding is that municipal waste-treatment plants and factories that discharged into the water were the major problems back then. And they have all come under various kinds of control and permitting, and they're limited in what they do, and they have to treat their waste and monitor their treatment. They've done a great job.

Now, the biggest source of unregulated pollution is what they call urban runoff. That's all the water that runs out of our society, runs through the streets and the gutters and down into the streams. It's not a point source; it comes from everywhere. It's everybody who waters their lawn, washes their car, runs their lawnmower. You can imagine, with 30 million people, 15 million or more in this part of the state, that urban runoff is the single biggest uncontrolled, unregulated source of contamination.'





I'd been too long around illness, death, and dying. I wasn't eager to attend a liturgical church. The Eucharist may symbolize hope, but the ritual contains references to suffering

and death. I didn't want to attend a synagogue, either. Even the most modernized Jewish liturgy offers prayers for the ill and the dead. I wanted up-beat.

"Unity is known as 'positive Christianity'.... We do not tell people what is wrong with them; we lift them by telling them what is right about them We are positive, friendly, and loving....'" The website for

Christ Church Unity in El Cajon suggested I'd found a winner. I remembered reading that Unity, as a denomination, was founded by Charles and Myrtle Fillmore — a pair of Midwestern hard-luck cases who in the late 1800s lost a bundle on bad real estate deals in Kansas City. The Fillmores, however, had a knack for theology. They perceived within Protestantism a kind of optimism that had mass-market potential. If the bread and wine

were mere symbols, why not take the metaphor and run with it? Why not say that the bread and wine represented "spiritual energy"? And the Crucifixion? It's not about death. "The cross symbolizes the crossing out of all false beliefs.'

Last Sunday morning about 100 folks filed into Christ Church Unity for the "All American Worship Service." They admired each other's red-white-and-blue blouses and dress shirts. They clucked over each other's American-flag earrings and tie clasps. One older fellow tugged at his Hawaiian shirt and announced, "There's a lot of red, white, and blue on here if you squint real hard!" Christ Church's senior pastor, Reverend Hammons, had two weeks ago suggested that everyone wear "patriotic dress" for the July 6 service.

The morning began with a piano medley of patriotic songs. After the Lord's Prayer and Gloria Patri, Reverend Hammons had us all stand, place our hands over our hearts, face the flag, and recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

We then sang "America the Beautiful" and, at Reverend Hammons's request, we recited aloud three times, "I am a child of God, living a life of freedom."

Reverend Hammons's sermon was an extended riff on "God Bless America," on just what we mean when we say "blessed."

"The country is actually in better con-dition than some negative people would have us believe," he told us. He wouldn't elaborate on what those negative people were saying, however. "I stay away from controversial things because they're such a waste of time when there are so many positive things to talk about."

Among those many positive things was Reverend Hammons's admonition that we "bless the rich." Condemning the rich would bring only "negativity" into our lives. "We

should instead thank them for all the taxes that they pay. Blessing the rich will bring affluence into your life. To criticize or to blame is to undermine life's possibilities."

Reverend Hammons told us that we should strive to be a blessing to America.

"We should use the power that we have to be a blessing. When we see something that's frightening or distressing, we should say, 'I can't go there. I need to be around *positive* things.'"

In addition to ignoring unpleasantness, he said, we could also be a blessing to America by simply doing what we do best, like "bowling and square dancing.²

"America's going to be more wonderful than it already is," he told us. "Thank you for being little positive rays of red, white, and blue light."

After the service

I told Reverend Hammons that I'd just read an article explaining how Mother Teresa had lived almost all her life in a state of agonizing doubt. I asked him what form doubt took for zealous optimists like himself. Did he ever doubt, for example, the power of positive thinking?

"I wouldn't call that doubt," he said. "I think something like that would be more a symptom of physical fatigue or lack of energy and not a spiritual matter.

"Unity is more of a thinking person's religion. It's not just a matter of positive thinking, but positive believing. Jesus is our role model. We believe that just as he was the Christ, we are the Christ. As he was the Anointed of God, so are we.

"I think doubt for us would be expressed in the fear that we would be a victim of circumstances beyond our control. That we would be trapped in a situation that we couldn't think our way out of."



An aesthetician friend recently brought up the thorny issue of appointment propriety. My friend had scheduled a facial for a new client, who was using a gift certificate. Three hours before the scheduled appointment, the client, whom my friend had never met, cancelled due to "stress." My friend was understandably irritated but also concerned. She didn't want to offend the new/potential client, but under normal circumstances, she would have charged her. (I believe it's almost standard procedure now to give 24 hours' advance warning - dentists, opthamologists, stylists all have such policies these days.) Under these unusual conditions (gift certificate, sight-unseen client), what do you suggest she should have done?

Dear Sally,

I know that the protocol with many doctors and dentists nowadays re: appointment cancellation is that you need to give them 24 hours' notice (or have a darn good reason why you couldn't --which means an emergency) or they charge you for missed appointments or last-minute cancellations. I don't think this is possible with new patients/customers, as one often doesn't have their billing information yet. I asked a couple of people who do hair and nails about the situation you described. They said they never charge regular customers who miss appointments. They added that if a customer is a regular no-call, noshow, they simply drop them as a client, because it screws up their schedule too much. In your friend's case I would suggest that as a good-will gesture she tell the new client that there's "no harm, no foul" in her cancelling this time. In the future, however, she will need to give at least 24 hours' notice or she will have to charge her for it, since that's her standing policy. Then she'll be warned, and perhaps next time she'll make it in: I've heard that facials are great stress relievers.

Dear Aunt Trudy,

Recently I was visiting my sister and her family for my niece's bat mitzvah, where I encountered a situation regarding accommodations that had me sputtering mad. A visiting cousin claimed that she could not afford to stay in a hotel like the rest of us, and because my sister wanted to accommodate my cousin (but could not accommodate my cousin in her own home) she took advantage of a generous circumstance typical in observant Jewish communities.  \mathbf{M} y brother and his wife like to tease me about the good life here in Southern California. They live in Michigan, and right about now, the humidity and the mosquitoes are starting to get serious. They've convinced themselves that there aren't even any flies, let alone mosquitoes, where I live. And they are forever imag-

ining that fresh fish leap out of my swimming pool and into my kitchen. Next month, they're coming to see paradise for themselves. One thing on

my brother's agenda is ocean fishing; he's hoping to catch a whop-

per of a tuna, maybe more than one. And being both a good sportsman and a seafood lover, he hopes to consume whatever he catches. Last week, he wrote and asked me about the possibility of getting some of that as-yet-uncaught tuna canned, so that he could take his spoils back to the Midwest. I said I'd look into it.

1

Paul Morris at Fisherman's Landing (619-221-8500) told me that "you're not going to find too many people that offer the canning service. We offer it to our customers, but it's not a moneymaking venture." When a fisherman makes a catch on a Fisherman's Landing boat, it goes into a hold filled with a brine solution. "The solution brings the temperature of the fish down below freezing," and it stays that way until the boat pulls in to the dock.

Then, "people that opt to have the fish canned deal with the canning service. The service picks up the fish, moves them to a freezer, and stores them until it has enough to ship to the cannery. The fish are then shipped offshore to Samoa and processed. We used to have Chicken of the Sea can the fish when they were up in San Pedro, but they've moved now. You get your cans right away; the fish are exchanged for cans on the spot." You don't have to wait for your fish to come back from Samoa, but the fish you get is not your catch. "There's an exchange rate that's set by the Department of Fish and

Game; it varies according to the value of the tuna and the cost of the cans." Whatever sort of tuna yellowfin, bluefin, albacore — customers turn in, "we give them back albacore." Right now, the rate is one six-ounce can of albacore for eight

pounds of fresh-caught yellowfin, and one can for four pounds of fresh-caught

albacore." One can for four pounds? "You have to realize that after they process a fish, about 50 percent is unusable; you've got heads, bones, and tails."

Besides canning, Fisherman's Landing also offers filleting and smoking services. If the fish onboard the boat has been stored at 30 degrees, "they can process fish for people as they return to the dock. You can get your fillets the same day." If the fish were fully frozen on board, "you can have the fillets "Some people get out the old

shipped anywhere, or you can come back down and pick them up. The cost typically runs \$.50 a pound. Smoking the fish runs \$1 a pound." And of course, you can always take your fish and process it at home. "Some people can the stuff themselves. They get out the old pressure cooker, cook it up, and can it.'

Fisherman's Landing offers processing only to customers on "trips that take three days or longer. We run trips up to 16 days. On three-day trips, we'll be fishing primarily for albacore and bluefin tuna. The longer trips are primarily for yellowfin tuna, yellowtail, and wahoo. Most of the fish being caught now are 15 to 18 pounds, with some 20- to 30-pound fish mixed in. Trips are about \$300 a day, but that varies depending on the number of people in the boat." Fisherman's Landing's boats can carry up to 30 passengers, and Morris notes that they come equipped with a proper chef.

If you're not on a three-day-plus outing with Fisherman's Landing, you can still get your fish pro-

cessed through Anthony's Dockside Services. Patricia Ghio (619-291-7254), head of Dockside Services, told me, "We contract with Point Loma Sports Fishing. Anytime their boats come in, our truck will go down with a crew and we'll take the fish back to our plant to process. Or, we

will exchange the fish out for fish that came in recently on one of the other boats. That way, the fishermen can take fish with them when they leave. Otherwise, we'll process the fish at our plant, Cryovac it, freeze it, and ship it to them. Or they can come pick it up.

"We also welcome anybody who wants to bring us their fish to walk over if we're on the docks that day. You can call me at the Dockside Services number, and I'll be happy to let you know when we're out meeting the boats. Or, they can drive their fish to our processing plant," located at 5232 Loveluck Street, off Morena Boulevard. "We're an early operation. Our fish butchers are here from 5 a.m. until 2 p.m. every day. We do anything you ask. If you want your own fish

back, it's no problem. All the fish come in tagged, and everybody's tag number is written on their order form. Most fishermen want their fish filleted; some of them call it 'loining'." Filleting runs **\$.50** a pound, and smoking, which Anthony's also offers, is **\$1** a pound.

Anthony's offers the government-regulated can-exchange as well. "It's from Chicken of the Sea, but it has our Anthony's label on it. It's really high quality; we get the best that Chicken of the Sea has to offer. We don't skimp.'

Point Loma Seafoods (619-223-1109) also offers fish processing, but no canexchange. Filleting is \$1 a pound with nextday service; smoking is \$1.75 a pound with three- to seven-day service. Vacuum packing is available for **\$1** a bag; **\$10** minimum.

All of her clothing is custom-made with specific clients in mind, several of whom are modeling for her in tonight's show. "I have to see their wardrobes so that what I'm making fits


Octaviana explains. The wearer's hands are also bound as his bridle is tugged by a corsetstrapped model.

URING MID-APRIL OF LAST YEAR, a large group of cowboys came into the Branded Oak restaurant on Maine Street in Lakeside. They had come from the rodeo grounds several blocks down the street, where tryouts for the 38th Annual Lakeside Rodeo were being held. Kelly Nashiyama, whose name belies her blond hair, was tending bar that day. She expected, when she saw the cowboys enter, if not the worst, then at least some rowdiness and a few orders of Jack Daniel's with beer chasers. What she got, instead, was a polite group of young men who, before they began to eat, held hands in a circle and prayed aloud. True, some of them ordered cocktails before lunch, but their tastes ran in the direction of "froufrou drinks, like piña coladas and strawberry daiquiris," says Nashiyama. From place names such as Kansas City and Oklahoma on their belt buckles, she concluded that the drinkers wanted to experience a little California exotic.

The cowboys left Nashiyama not only a healthy tip on their way back to the arena but a shattered image of rodeo cowboys. On her last pass among the tables of diners before their departure, however, one of them convinced her that she had not been dreaming. He grabbed her butt, she says, as she was clearing away their dishes and silverware.

Legend and song have pictured rodeo cowboys as harddriving, hard-drinking, woman-chasing free spirits. "And that's true," says the Reverend Bob Harris, a handsome 52-year-old former cowboy himself. "But I'm not trying to persuade these people to quit what they're doing. That's not my goal. My goal is to be an example of the rodeo cowboy who can live the Christian life. Then, when people ask me why I'm joyful or why I help, I tell them it's because I've got the joy of the Lord in me. They say, 'What's that?' And that gives me an opportunity to open the Scriptures up and share with them what it means to have the joy of the Lord."

Harris reaches into a satchel at his side and pulls out several three- by four-inch paperback volumes that have the title *The Way for Cowboys*. He calls it the cowboy Bible and presents me one as a gift. Then he starts paging through another to show me its contents. As part of his "behind-the-chutes ministry," he hands it out free to cowboys and displays it with other literature on a table at the back of his cowboy-church services. The ministry also includes praying with the cowboys behind the arena minutes before the rodeo starts. "Those are called prayer power-ups," says Harris, who looks younger than his 52 years, despite showing a little post-athletic girth.

The bulk of the cowboy Bible is the New Testament, but

it has Psalms and Proverbs from the Old Testament as well. "This is a good book for cowboys," says Harris. "It puts things in simple terms. It has some cowboy poetry in it. It has some testimonies from different phases of cowboy life, the ranching cowboy, the country-music cowboy and cowgirl. Here's Paul and Susie Luchsinger, but Susie is Susie McEntire, related to Reba McEntire." And she does look like Reba.

Harris also shows me pictures in the cowboy Bible of rodeo scenes and cowboys, including world-champion bull rider Cody Custer, whose brother Jim Bob is participating in the Lakeside events. "There's Jenna Beaver, Joe Beaver's wife, and Joe Beaver was here last night. He's an eight-time world champion, 17-time qualifier for the National Finals Rodeo. He's a Christian brother."

Harris consulted with the group who put *The Way for Cowboys* together. "We said we needed a specific Bible designed for the cowboy community," he tells me.

The Reverend Harris founded and runs Good Company Rodeo Ministries, a one-man mission spreading the Christian gospel to the cowboy community throughout California rodeos. From a home base in Menifee, in Riverside County, he is like the old circuit-rider preachers of the 19th-century American frontier. In San Diego County, his charge includes the Lakeside Rodeo, the Ramona Roundup Rodeo, and the Poway Rodeo.

My first experience of Harris is through sound only. I have braved a light rain to come to the Friday-night opening of the Lakeside Rodeo in search of him. To launch the events, *continued on page 51*

Unforgettable

LONG-AGO

"We exist on this planet by geologic consent," wrote historian Will Durant. To the 12,000 new residents of the Imperial Valley, between 1905 and 1907, it looked as if nature rescinded the bargain.

Efforts to bend a portion of the Colorado River into the valley collapsed on August 9, 1905. The entire river burst through an irrigation intake, just inside the Mexican border, made a right turn, and rushed northwest for 50 miles, flooding the countryside and creating the Salton Sea.

The roiling waters gouged silty soil like a battering ram with teeth. Floodwaters packed with driftwood carved steep

barrancas, wiped out farms, and threatened the small tent and thatchedhut towns growing around the valley. The Califor-

nia Development Company promised a steady flow of water. Instead, settlers saw what Noah must have seen: a voracious deluge, determined to engulf.

William deBuys: "There was good reason to believe it might. [Settlers] saw little hope of resisting the Colorado. They also knew that if they stayed put, the floodwaters would cover their bones only after each of them first died of thirst: their sole source of water was the distribution of California Development Company canals, which the flood was eroding, breaching, destroying."

Thousands became stranded. Homeless Mexican families huddled on small, temporary islands, praying for rescue. Near Brawley, farmers strung a cable across New River, one of the two major flood channels. They attached an undertaker's basket. A mule towed the cable, pulling people, chickens, grain, and supplies on the "aerial tramway" at 25 cents per person. Others tried a flat-bottomed boat, also on cable, but it tore loose and disappeared downriver.

Eighty-year-old Nathan Lane lived three miles west of Calexico. When rescuers arrived, he refused help. Eight days later, the boat returned. Mud-brown water had risen to the roof of Lane's shack, where he'd lashed his mattress. For three days and nights he fought off rattlesnakes desperate for a dry haven. One bit him.

The California Development Company got caught between too little and too much water for settlers. Though previous attempts failed, the CDC planned two control gates: a permanent fixture at Pilot Knob, across from Yuma; and a temporary, wooden headgate — called the "Rockwood Gate" — just north of the Mexican intake, where the runaway river turned west.

Begun in November 1906, the fifth attempt to close the gap, the Rockwood Gate, became more controversial than its predecessors. Many argued that an Aframe headgate couldn't hold back the river, rushing through the half-mile-wide crevasse, especially if sunk into soft, alluvial soil. Plus, 160 laborers working day and night had to complete the job before

the summer floods. Workers finished the gate April 18, 1906, around noon. Earlier that morning, at 5:16 a.m., the earthquake of the century had demolished San Francisco. Fires spread everywhere. Much of the financial aid promised to Imperial Valley went north, though E.H. Harriman, owner of the flood-threatened Southern Pacific railroad, pledged contin-

ued support. (San Diego experienced a tremor at 4:29 that afternoon. Although it caused no serious damage, rumor spread through Los Angeles that a tidal wave had wiped out San Diego and Coronado.)

The next day, writes Margaret Romer, "The maddest flood of all came tearing down the Colorado. It was far beyond the capacity of the newly completed dam, washing it out as if it were so much kindling! The crevasse was ever widening, and the whole Colorado poured through it at the rate of 4,000,000,000 cubic feet per day."

Another flood in June widened the gap to a half mile. No Colorado water flowed to the Gulf. Willows sprouted in the old riverbed. As floodwaters cascaded north, they grew eight to ten miles wide, washed away an estimated 10,000 acres, and culminated in the Salton Sea, which covered 400 square miles and rose seven inches a day.

A rare phenomenon began near the Salton shore. The force of the floods, heading downhill to the valley, eroded

the silt at such a rapid rate that waterfalls formed. These merged into a large cataract, which soon spanned the entire width of New River. Churning the soil at its base, the cataract began to "cutback" — literally moved upstream — and grew steeper as it gouged soft strata.

Niagara Falls erodes a bit each year. Its rock base makes for gradual loss. But imagine Niagara Falls in reverse, backcutting a thousand feet per day, leaving an ever-widening swath in its wake. And imagine the threat. Helen Hosmer: "If the river cut back to Yuma, it would not only destroy the government's new Laguna Dam then under construction, but it might well dredge a channel *below* sea level, making it all but impossible to return to its original channel toward the gulf."

A more immediate problem: to reach Yuma and Laguna Dam, the cutback would carve through Calexico and Mexicali. The sister towns on the U.S./Mexico border, inundated by floods from the south, now became threatened from the north. Both stood on the eastern shore of

New River, and sections of their riverbanks had already crumbled. By mid-June the cutback thundered toward the towns a mile a day, with an average drop of 28 feet.

People could hear the monster coming — a roar of plunging cataracts and feel seismic trembles as great chunks of earth slammed into the torrent. Some said it sounded like faroff artillery fire. They also saw signs of its damage, as families from battered El Centro, Brawley, and nearby farms arrived in wagons piled high with their possessions.

Complete destruction could happen in weeks. The

first threat to Calexico and Mexicali, however, came from the south. Rising floodwaters from the Colorado filled Volcano Lake, in Mexico, and a new wall of water headed north — literally a river inside the river — gave them two options: "Fight or drown."

Amid stifling summer heat, and under lanterns at night, they erected a sixfoot-high sandbag levee with shovels, mules, and every available hand. DeBuys: "When they ran out of shovels, they used saucepans. When the waters sucked away part of the levee, they dragged mattresses out of their lean-tos and tents...and

shoved them into the breach or tethered them against the sides of the channel." They hacked down a handsome row of cottonwoods and heaved them onto the barricade. "Most of them being ardent Christians, they sang hymns against the roar of the water."

Charles Perry, a CDC engineer, had an idea: the cutback was 16 miles north of Calexico. At its current rate of speed, it wouldn't reach town for two weeks. If they could accelerate the process with dynamite and divert New River to the west, the canyon it was digging might draw off the floodwaters. One natural disaster might avert another.

They tested the idea near town. Any debris, any impediment lodged in the friable soil created a whirlpool effect that could alter the cutback's direction. A mass of tree trunks, brush, and pilings had gathered near Calexico. If someone didn't blast it away, when the cutback hit the pile it might change course and knife through the heart of town.

One man volunteered. Mobley Meadows was Imperial County's first sheriff in 1907. He owned a livery stable in Calexico. A crack shot, famous throughout the Southwest as a lawman, Meadows was the model for *The Plainsman* by Harold Bell Wright. His statue, on the courthouse grounds, was the first erected in Calexico.

Dynamite strapped to his back, Meadows dogpaddled downstream, dodging everything from angry rapids and tree trunks to dead animals. He planted the charge and swam to safety.

The blast splintered the pile. Inspired by his success, Perry, Meadows, and 11 volunteers headed down New River to where the cutback raged. Meadows and another, unnamed man got in a boat. A long rope, tied to the craft and held by volunteers onshore, floated the rocking boat downstream. No more than five feet from the edge, Meadows lit a long fuse and lowered a box of dynamite over the falls. Volunteers towed the boat upstream. No explosion. A second attempt: same result. Was the fuse too long? Did the massive swirls of mist and spray, rising hundreds of feet in the air, extinguish it?

Perry tried. He used a shorter fuse wrapped in rags. As the men onshore towed him upriver, the dynamite exploded. His boat flew into the air, and 50 feet of the cliff fell away.

The tow rope pulled

Perry to safety. Even though they had an estimated 50-50 chance of coming back alive, volunteers went to work in twos. One craft tilted on the rim at a 45-degree angle. Another man fell over the falls but swam to safety. The "dynamite wagon" traveled from Calexico to the site and back many times, as the volunteers made "liberal use" of its contents.

The blasting accelerated the cutback's speed, causing the floodwaters from Mexico to subside. From the top of Calexico's two-story hotel, in every direction one saw a "vast expanse of flooded lands."

The cutback kept coming, however. On the outskirts of Calexico, as a southern gale lashed tall waves, the volunteers strung a cable across the river. The aim was to divert the cutback to an old channel west of town. One by one, slapped by wind and spray, Meadows and others inched along the slippery metal. They lit fuses, dropped hissing dynamite and gunpowder sacks into the seething rapids, then clung to the cable for dear life as the charge went off.

Townspeople removed many frame buildings beforehand, but on the first night a water tower fell. Soon the cutback struck the edges of Calexico, shearing cliffs. Structures tipped, then tumbled into the current. Most of the town survived the assault; dynamiting proved a partial success. But 80 percent of Mexicali's adobe sheds and shacks vanished in the roar — "no doubt," writes deBuys, "sacrificed to the very currents that had been deflected from Calexico."

Perry, Meadows, and a crew of volunteers chased the cutback into Mexico and, after several failed attempts, made a stand near Cerro Prieto (Black Butte). They erected brush weirs in the water. Dynamiting steamy, volcanic mud often crawling across it to set the charges — the crew forced the cutback to circle into itself. The whirlpool unwound into mini-waterfalls; then disappeared.

The Alamo Canal, ten miles east of New River, also had a cutback that dug a steep barranca before it expired. Out of the havoc came a geological irony. Edgar F. Howe: "The hundreds of acres of farming land lost...were the greatest single gain ever made in the physical condition of the Valley. For the sacrifice of these made possible the development of two drainage channels that answered the last question concerning the future of this Valley as an irrigated district."

Nature had dug two deep, 40-mile-long ditches for the Imperial Valley. They carried to the Salton Sea four times the sediment excavated for the Panama Canal. But the California Development Company and the remaining settlers of the valley still had a problem: the Colorado River flowed unchecked. Romer: "There was little in recorded history to help the engineers in their gigantic task...Three hundred million cubic feet of water every hour were rushing down a 400-foot slope, through easily eroded soil into a basin about the size of Long Island Sound."







About how much money does it cost each time you go riding?

"Well, now that the gas prices have gone up, we usually spend probably about \$150 just on repairing bikes and buying gas and food and ice."

Where else have you ridden in San Diego County? "We just go out to the desert, which is pretty much out of San Diego County."

Where do you think the most dangerous place is to ride in San Diego? "I don't know about San Diego, but probably Glamis, just because there are so many drunks out there who like to drink and ride at the same time."

What could be done to make it a safer place to ride?

"There is really nothing they can do unless they get more rangers, and the rangers are really ineffective as it is, so they post signs to say no drinking and riding, but there's really nothing they can do."

Have you ever seen anyone get into an accident after drinking and riding? "Oh, yeah. The reason why I don't ride any of the competition hills at night is because there were these two guys who got plastered one night and thought that it'd be cool to just race up the hill. So they raced up, but one guy hit a bump wrong and his bike swerved and hit this girl who was riding next to him — and he was fine, of course, but she tumbled her bike and it landed on her as she was going down the hill and people had to swerve out of her way. They had to call the ambulance...I think she broke her neck and fractured her shoulder and broke her leg."

Do you ever see people drinking beer while out riding?

"Yeah. 

When Harris is finished, the evening's announcer, seated on his horse in the arena, and microphone in hand, pumps the crowd. "Are you ready to rodeo?" he shouts.

At the following afternoon's performance, I first lay eyes on Harris from a position high in the bleachers. Calves are bolting into the arena to the pleasure of throngs of people anxious to see them roped by cowboys on galloping horses in hot pursuit. The rain is gone, and a bright spring sun beats down on a number of middle-aged men who, in

Stetsons and colorful shirts, are helping to orchestrate the spectacle. I have seen a picture of Harris on his webpage (www.good companyrodeoministry. com), so I pick him out in the chutes at my end of the arena, opening and closing the barrier gate that confines the calves until their turns come. He shuffles back and forth in thick damp dirt that has been churned by the sharp hooves of the livestock animals. A smell of cattle dung wafts up from below.

drink hard, and chase women? What are they trying to prove? They're trying to fill up the void."

A young woman approaches and interrupts our conversation. She wants to thank Harris for helping her and her boyfriend to get back together. As a result, she says, they plan to marry in a few months. Harris is gracious in accepting her gratitude.

"People are trying to fill up what's missing in their lives," Harris goes on, "and, of course, what's missing in most people's lives is relationship. I'm not a religious person, but I'm a relationship person. I have a relationship with God through Jesus Christ, and that's what people are looking for, relationships. But they find them empty. The world doesn't provide for us."

to a missions conference in Virginia Beach, Virginia. One of the workshops at that conference focused on "the fact that the American church had stopped being relevant to the community it was serving," he says. Among churches, "The normal concept of becoming more relevant is, okay, we're going to send a missionary to Africa or South America." But a speaker at the conference claimed that African and Philippine Christians had started to send missionaries to the United States. Harris cites some statistics indicating that fewer and fewer Americans in recent years report believing in God.

"Of course, that has changed somewhat after 9/11," he says. "But I've realized that you can take any avocation that you like — baseball, whatever — and you can bring Christ into it at any level and make a difference in people's lives." That's what Harris and many other cowboy ministers are doing in the world of rodeo. Numerous rodeo ministries across America are listed on the Internet.

Says Harris, "If you read the Bible, what made Jesus so attractive to people was that He went out amongst them. He became part of them. People today find it hard to identify with the television evangelists. I'm not talking about Pat Robertson or Robert Schuller; those individuals have integrity beyond — a Billy Graham. But it's hard for the everyday person to identify with the Sunday-morning preacher up there blowin' and goin' and preaching in the suits and all that, when we know that these guys drive around in limousines and the rest of us do other things."

The world of rodeo seems, much of the time, to contrast with the dominant trends of



our current culture. Rodeo promoters advertise their product as enhancing family values and a wholesome character. Harris agrees to my proposition that rodeo, to many people, is symbolic of a healthier lifestyle than what is available in most city and suburban life.

"Is that due to an association of rodeos with the farm and ranch?" I ask.

"The association is with a life gone by," says Harris, who mentions a golden age that "lasted about 30 years, from 1855 to roughly 1885. That was the heyday of the cowboy. The cowboy is a derivative of the Spanish vaquero out of Texas, which had been Mexico. The cowboy is a traditional hero in America, made into one by people like Jimmy Stewart, John Wayne, and, in recent years, by Tom Selleck and some of these other people who are actors as well as cowboys.

"Now, everybody looks at the rodeo cowboy as the center of the business. But the center of the business is the stock contractor. Without the stock contractor, without the guy who has the heart to

breed and raise and train and spend the money to travel and set these things up, you don't have rodeo. The stock contractor is the heart. He provides the structure for rodeo, and the rodeo cowboy is only a part of the whole thing.

"But it is good family fun, one of the few places where a family of four can go for less than \$50 and have a hoot and a holler and enjoy a good show. And a rodeo is a show. It is a performance from start to finish."

Noticing that a hotdog and popcorn each cost a dollar at the Lakeside events, I compare rodeo to going to a Charger or Padre game at Qualcomm Stadium.

"To see the Padres, a family of four spends \$100 at a Sunday game. Rodeo is a great bar-







gain. And a lot of people enjoy it," says Harris. The price of admission at Lakeside is \$5, and \$10 for the Sunday

he says. "I have

Catholics. I've had some Jewish guys come to my services. I've had Mormons and Jehovah's Witnesses. Whatever their faith is, they

can come and hear the Word preached. My goal is that some individuals would hear the gospel, that it would touch some place in their hearts, and it would draw them into a relationship with Christ, which then draws them into a relationship with the Father, because it says in the Bible that no one can get to the Father except through the Son. And that's my goal."

One-on-one, Harris says he takes a person "through the basic Roman road, through the Scriptures in [the Epistle to the] Romans, that we've all sinned, we fall short of the glory, every knee shall bow, and so on. Then I ask them straight out, 'Would you like to

receive the Lord as your personal Savior?' And some say yes and some say no, which I don't take as an affront, because I'm only planting seeds.

"I take a nonjudgmental approach to cowboys and their families and their lifestyle, and that's important, because, as my first pastor and my grandfather used to say, nobody's going to care what you talk about until they know that you care about them. When you have a normal church situation, as nonjudgmental as they try to be, you have people inside the church that forgot where they came from. So I spend more time caring about the cowboy at the rodeo, always encouraging, always giving a positive approach to life, than I do about preaching the gospel. I do care about preaching the gospel, but maybe what I do

speaks louder than what I say. That's my approach, and the approach has been good for ten years. The ministry's been fruitful, and many of these guys that I see here are guys that I remember when they were in high school and doing junior rodeo ten years ago."

"What sorts of concerns," I ask Harris, "do cowboys bring to you when they want some advice or counseling?"

"The same concerns that we all have," he says. "What am I going to do tomorrow? What's life all about? How come my relationships aren't working out? How come I can't stop drinking? How come I don't feel good inside? How come I'm discouraged? I've lost my courage. There's nothing new under the sun. Cowboys are people. They are a segment of the population that's a little bit different."



"When you pray with the cowboys before the rodeo starts, do you think some of them are scared?" "I don't know. Probably," says Harris with a reluctance that suggests he doesn't want to betray a trust. But I pry. "Do they ever talk to you about fears they have?"

"We do in private, not in the prayer meetings. Being a cowboy's a macho thing, so you may be scared, but you're not going to admit it. But I can see it in their hands and their eyes. That's why I stay behind them. Sometimes I'll run my hand up on the shoulder of a cowboy and tell him he's going to do all right or something like that."

As we talk, a cowboy passing by calls out, "Hey, chap! Your lips chapped today, chaplain?" Harris calls him over and introduces him to me. Justin Andrade is a short, wiry bull rider with a black Stetson on his head. He has come to Lakeside from his home in Grover City, near San Luis Obispo. "See his buckle," says Harris. "That means he won first place in Houston. Now there's a rodeo for

you."

Recently, I looked up Andrade on Pro-Rodeo.com to see how well he was doing in other places. An injury report linked to the site said that on June 24 he "sustained a concussion without loss of consciousness...when he was struck in the head by the bull's horn." I searched for him again this past January. The Jack Daniel's World Standings on the same site indicated that Andrade did well in 2002. He made the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas in December. But he got hurt in that event too, suffering "a herniated disc in his neck and spinal cord compression and bruising after landing on his head Dec. 6."

Few rodeo people will deny that the sport is dangerous. "Last year," says Harris, "I had three of the cowboys that I normally minis-





ter to get hurt. The most serious involved a fellow named Ioe Rodriguez who got hurt at Poway, then spent a few days in the hospital and had an MRI. He fractured his neck, but, as cowboys do, when they wanted to put him in traction and perform some surgery right away, he said, 'No, I'm not gonna to do that, I'm goin' home.' So he checked himself out of the hospital. I drove him to his truck, picked up his gear, and sent him on his way. He drove home to Texas with a fractured neck and had surgery down there. So, yes, from time to time the cowboys do get hurt, especially if they don't know what they're doing."

That's what Joe Oakes tells me too. "If you've grown up with it, like my whole family has, you get used to it." Oakes is a bull rider from Bend, Oregon. I notice that, like most of the rodeo cowboys, his hair is cut like a Marine's. And, not having seen one yet, I wonder whether I will see a mullet in Lakeside.


Love of the sport and the quest for fame and fortune drive cowboys to brave dangers that most of us would not. In addition, rodeo competitors travel thousands of miles a year to enter events far from their homes. Bob Harris and I look at the Lakeside Rodeo program and see that one contestant has come from North Dakota and another from Vancouver, British Columbia.

"All that must be hard on their relationships at home," I remark.

"Very much so," says Harris. "I was talking with a guy who's been a Christian a long time and comes from a Christian family. Last year he and his wife were near divorce. I told him, 'I know. I was going to call you up and ask what's going on.' And he said, 'We figured it out. It was ridiculous. We were running here, running there.' That's what was wrong, they got it together and did some counseling — went through a couple of Christian programs and they're back together and strong.

"What happens is that sometimes these cowboys' egos get in the way. Then, you're traveling with the same people who are thinking the same way you do. And you say, 'I'm not getting along with my girlfriend, I'm not getting along with my wife, I'm not getting along with my parents,' and you ask the people around you, 'What should I do about it?' Well, what are they going to tell you? 'Chuck it,' they might say. But if there is somebody out there who's got the wisdom of God flowing through them by the Holy Spirit and has got some experience, then that individual can say, 'Hey, here are some alternatives. Maybe you need to back off the rodeo for a while. Maybe the two of you need to back off of traveling and spend some time getting reacquainted with one another.' Of course, that's the worst thing for a cowboy to hear. I mean, he's making a run for the gold, and you say, 'Take a month off.'

"But I explain to them, 'You take a month off and get your relationship right this way,' " says Harris, who raises and lowers his arms in front of him, " 'and you get your relationship right this way," and he moves his arms horizontally, " 'then your mind is clear, your relationships are clear, and you go back on the road with assurance. And you can





start winning.' "

On Sunday morning I attend cowboy church in a covered area behind the arena. I had already used it to stay out of the rain on Friday evening. Then, snack bars were open inside it and tables set out at which people could eat. We use the tables this morning for our pews.

Although, as a church member tells me, they have no cowboys in the congregation, Hosanna Christian Fellowship, on Maine Street between the Branded Oak and the rodeo grounds, puts on the Lakeside Rodeo cowboy church each year. As he is doing this morning, the church's pastor, Leon Hostetler, delivers the sermon. Before he starts, a male vocalist with guitar sings "The Old Rugged Cross" and several other songs. Front right sits Bob Harris, who, to the music, leads many in the audience of about 50 in hoisting their arms in praise. The Reverend

Hostetler preaches on 2 Corinthians, chapter 12, which contains the famous reference to St. Paul's mysterious "thorn in the flesh." We should not think it was only Paul's problem, he tells us. God puts all manner of trouble and obstacles in our lives to bring us out of our selfpreoccupation and back to Him. He uses them to break us, as a trainer breaks a horse, not of its strength but of its self-will.

After church, Hosanna Christian Fellowship treats everyone present to a breakfast of pancakes, ham, and fruit. I sit inside a pavilion and enjoy the blessing with Harris and several of his friends. The long sitting finally gets to Harris's lower back, which he had injured in his performing days. He gets up holding it and searches for an Aleve.

I ask Harris to take me back to the idea of the void in people's lives that he mentioned when we first talked. "I gather, in your view, that that's behind some of the things cowboys get into that probably

"All right, let's talk about it," he says. "God created us and He gave us free will, and Adam and Eve sinned. A lot of times the religious community will condemn individuals for discipline, it requires responsibility, and it requires making a decision to do something other than what that sin thing is.

"But for me, or for any preacher, to stand up and say that someone is bad for doing things is not right, because the Bible teaches us that we all sin, we all fall short, that even the righteousness of the church is that of filthy rags. It's human nature for people to sin, but it's also human nature for people to want to fill up the void. All right, you party, you drink, you go out and have multiple partners. All of that is to fill a void in your life, and that void is the natural thing that God set inside of us, our yearning for a relationship with Him, a spiritual relationship. We here in the West have lost the concept of spirituality, although I find it unique that, everywhere you go now, you've got American flags, you've got 'God bless America,' you've got all this stuff going on, the patriotism and everything. But it took

what I was saying, we can either be dogmatic about our relationship with people, or we can have the mercy of God. It's like this. Here's Jesus on the cross. He's crucified after being beaten up and whipped and lashed and stuck with a pig sticker, and yet He pushes Himself up on the cross and says to one of the thieves dying with Him, 'Today you will be with Me in paradise.' So He had the mercy of God. But mercy is a hard concept for us.

"I started to talk about Western culture, not cowboy culture but Western [European] culture in general. And I find that people who are in the rodeo lifestyle, and who are around rodeo, understand life, death, and commitment. They deal with animals all the time. You know, most of your people who live in the city don't deal much with loss, and then they don't really deal with it. Most of your people who live in the country deal with loss quite often, a lost cow, a pig, a favorite pig that you've raised but you now have to slaughter for food. So they deal with the common things of life, and didn't Christ tell us that it was the common things that were going to confound the wise?" Ten years ago, Bob

Harris officiated for the first time at his own cowboy-church service in Lake Elsinore, 70 miles northeast of San Diego. Coy Huffman, who together with another cowboy preacher held the first cowboy church ever at a national finals rodeo 25 years ago, had been doing the Sundaymorning service each year at the rodeo in Elsinore. But in 1992 he couldn't make it. So he asked Harris, at the time a local minister and newspaper reporter

in Elsinore, to substitute for him that Sunday morning.

The two ministers had met the year before when the *Lake Elsinore* Valley Sun-Tribune asked for volunteers from among its writers to cover the local rodeo. All the other reporters moaned and groaned at the thought of the assignment. "I was dealing with a lot of city reporters who were saying, 'Why can't I go to the wine festival? That way I can have some wine.''

So Harris jumped at the opportunity himself. The result was an article about Coy Huffman and cowboy church that not only ran locally but also was picked up by the UPI wire service and that Harris sold, one more time, to a magazine.

Thus began a long

friendship and occasional working relationship between Harris and Coy Huffman. When he did the cowboy-church service in 1992, says Harris, "I had three cowboys come up and give their lives to the Lord. And I found that rewarding. You don't often get a chance to reap the seeds that somebody else has sown. And then I didn't see these guys, but a year later they were still walking with the Lord, and I thought, This is powerful. So I called up Coy and said, 'Do you think the world can handle another cowboy minister?' And he said, 'Sure, come along.' '

So Harris started attending rodeos parttime at first, then fulltime, and finally set up a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization in 1997. He says that the min-

used parables or anecdotes about the life the people that He was preaching to lived every day. As a rodeo cowboy, I use stories about the life that rodeo cowboys live. Some of my sermons might start off with 'Let's spur out for God' or 'Let's crack out for God.' Or I might use the example of a saddle-bronc rider and what he has to do in relationship to the sermon."

In May I go to Sunday cowboy church at the Ramona Roundup Rodeo. Bob Harris is preaching this morning. The congregation gathers behind the Fred Grand Arena in one of the animal-holding pens that has been converted into a hospitality center for rodeo performers and personnel. As the day wears on toward performance time, a guard will protect resting cowboys from the onslaught of fans. Inside, from a covered table, several women serve coffee and doughnuts before the service starts. I hear one of them explaining that refreshments are "for cowboys only."

About 30 of us sit down in folding chairs on patchy grass and face the parking lot full of horse trailers behind the arena grounds. A rectangular table with an albatross of a sound system on it is the closest thing we have to an altar this morning. Though the day is overcast, the tree branches overhead allow heaven to shine on us. The walls of our sanctuary are chain-link fences, behind one of which, to our right, stands a young black-and-white goat peering into our midst.

Harris introduces Lefty More Than Allright, who identifies himself as a cowboy poet and says he is writing a book called Godly Wisdom and Cowboy Proverbs. A sample of the proverbs? "If it's raining on your parade, go have a picnic. There won't be any ants." "A warm heart will help cold feet." "If you walk in fear, you can't run in faith." "One man's lamb is another man's beef." "City streets can't take you away like country roads." "Starting your day off with coffee won't keep you going like starting your day with prayer."

With a highpitched twang, Lefty sings into a microphone about faith, the

morning's topic, which, he reminds us, Jesus compared to a mustard seed. "Those things are little," he says. The song says that a little faith will take you a long way. "It ain't a great big theological deal. We make it bigger than it is."

Noting before his sermon that Lefty got up this morning at five to come down from Burbank, Harris says, "He's not a movie star, but he's one excellent poet."

Harris preaches this morning on the story of

Jesus' feeding 5000 people with five loaves and five fishes. Calling God "the specialist in helping us with our impossible situations," Harris exhorts us not to worry so much about things that "impossibility becomes our barrier gate." He cites the time that he came to a rodeo without enough money to drive home and left having given money to cowboys who couldn't get to their next destination. "God provides," says Harris.

Before we disperse, I spot my first mullet, a thick, bushy one. The wearer, a somber man in his 30s, has been hanging at the back of in a close tête-à-tête with Harris near the fence. Harris has placed his hand on the man's

our little congregation throughout the service. After it finishes, however, I turn and see him shoulder and is looking him gently but squarely in the eye. The moment seems far too private for me to snoop.

While we have been worshipping under the dome of heaven, two Christian cowboys who live in Ramona, Matt Deskovick and Chad Waldhauser, attended church at their spiritual home, Calvary Chapel, across town. Deskovick is a steer wrestler and Waldhauser a bronc rider. Both of them have competed in the California Finals Rodeo. But they have come to rodeo along different paths.

Several weeks later, Deskovick agrees to meet me after church at the junior high school, where the Calvary Chapel congregation meets on Sunday mornings. During the service, a singer with guitar leads the flock in songs whose words are flashed on a screen behind him by computer. Then a man, who strikes me as a lay leader, tells the congregation that, although Pastor Rob is not wearing his cowboy boots this morning, they should not worry. He is fine.

Laughs abound, the

lay leader makes a few announcements, and the 200 or more worshippers sing again. At last, Pastor Rob Hubbard is ready to speak. A handsome man dressed casually, he is preaching on chapter 17 of the Book of Revelation. With a smooth delivery, he lays out the structure of the chapter with its woman riding the beast of seven heads


and ten horns. We are in the end times, he says, and the Antichrist is among us in the form of the Catholic Church, not its individual members, mind you, some of whom are holy, but its "system," aligned as it is with today's world system. And then come admonitions. Pastor Hubbard exhorts us to jump off the beast, before it bucks us and

destroys us, like it destroys the woman in the chapter. It may hurt when we do it, but God is a loving God and will care for us. We must give up pornography if we are sneaking looks at it out of sight of our wives at night. We must give up adultery if we have fallen into the temptation of straying from our marriage vows. We must give up

fornication if we have succumbed to sex in a relationship before marriage. We must forsake alcohol, the great destroyer of lives. And, lest we should fall into financial ruin, we must stop gambling at Barona, not far away, or anywhere else for that matter. Pastor Hubbard hints that he knows whereof he speaks from experience with one or

another of the vices he has excoriated. Yet his passionate warnings seem all the more to convict every member of the congregation, which sits in one of those palpable silences that a powerful preacher can bring on. When I find

Deskovick in the parking lot after church, he is on a cell phone to his former girlfriend. "Get



down here for the 11 o'clock service," he tells her. "The sermon is a good one this morning." Matt Deskovick,

who is 29, was born in New Jersey, moved to Ramona when he was 13, and has lived here ever since. He has competed in rodeo for about seven years. While in high school, he wrestled and played football. Tall, with a shock of blond hair on the top of his head, he is still built like a football player.

"Then I went to a rodeo in my senior year," says Deskovick, "saw the steer wrestling, and thought, that's something I need to do."

I ask Deskovick, who earns his living primarily as a general contractor, what it was about rodeo that he liked so much.

"I don't know," he says. "It makes you want to go do it. But it took another four years until I found somebody who could take me under his wing and teach me, because I didn't know anything about it. Fred Hyatt did, and here I am." Hyatt is a former football star from El Capitan High School in Lakeside. He still competes in steer wrestling and sells insurance in El Cajon.

"I heard your pastor mention something about the religion of self-effort this morning," I say. "Does competition in rodeo ever threaten to become the highest priority in your life, even higher than your Christian faith? In football, Vince Lombardi of the old Green Bay Packers used to say that winning isn't everything; it's the only thing."

"I don't think so," says Deskovick. "I started wrestling in third grade, and competition is extremely



natural. Anything, if you allow it to happen, can overpower you and become vour demon. I don't drink, but some people do and allow it to abuse them. The same with women and with cars. Sure, competition can definitely control you, if you want it to. I go to Vegas once or twice a year and have a good time, and I don't

Red Lodge, Montana. "It wasn't ours," he says, "but I worked on it from the time I was about 7 until I was 18." When I ask whether that's what got him involved in rodeo, he says, "I like to tell people that that's like asking a kid who grew up in Del Mar why he surfs."

Waldhauser is married and has two small children, a seven-weekold boy and a threeyear-old girl. A third child, from a former marriage, lives with her





mother in Reno.

Whatever openness to religion one finds among rodeo cowboys may result from the ranching ethos that many of them come from, says Waldhauser. On the ranch, Sunday is a day of rest, and many ranchers attend church on that day.

"That's something you grow up with," he says. "Farmers and ranchers see life-anddeath situations firsthand every day, with your cattle and your crops and the whole

I'm hoping that the faith is not going from the rodeo guys to the rancher guys as much as in the other direction, that the cowboys are finally showing, in public and in the rodeo arena, what they grew up with. Before, you were a rough, tough cowboy and you didn't show your softer side, for lack of better words. They're now saying, 'Yeah, I did grow up with these beliefs. And now that being a cowboy is not so hardnosed and hard-knocks anymore, I'm not afraid to show it in public.' "

"So in an earlier generation," I say, "they held Christian beliefs, but they didn't talk about them because they were more macho then."

"Exactly. Nothing bothered you and you lived for yourself. But at home, Mama grabbed you by the ear and dragged you to church on Sunday. That was it." Another trend, says

Waldhauser, is that "rodeo athletes now are starting to be a little more colorful, where it used to be that you came and you rode and you shut your mouth and you left. Now they're saying, 'Hey, there's attention out there to get, and I want to grab some.'

"So they'll be a little more flamboyant, and, of course, you've got both ends of it." Here Waldhauser brings up the case of Sid Steiner, a bulldogger who made the finals last year and who, he says, "is a young gun with long hair. He wears his hair in cornrows at the rodeo." I wonder whether Steiner is trying to get creative with a mullet. A glance at some pictures of him on the Web confirms the possibility. Steiner, Waldhauser continues, "likes to wear wild shirts that aren't even Western shirts but look like silk. Shoot, he wore one last year that had a fur collar on it. He bulldogged every night in leather pants. He's flamboyant and outgoing. He's got earrings in both ears and a piercing on one side of his chest, and he's got a big old hog and likes to ride around



without his shirt on and show his tattoos. Now, what his belief is, I don't know. But a few other guys are going that direction. They pump the crowd a little more than cowboys used to.

"Once you see that attention — and people can deny it all they want — you want to draw it to you to some degree. Every person is going to be slightly different. The Christian guys are drawing attention to their belief."

"Couldn't there be

a confusion for a Christian," I ask, "between calling attention to his belief and calling attention to his own person?"

"There can be," says Waldhauser. "But in a lot of the interviews on television, the cowboys give thanks. The interviewer will say, 'What do you think got you here?' And they'll say, 'The first thing that got me here was my faith.' And people will notice that. When you don't say it, they'll notice it also." Waldhauser likes the Christian hymn "The Old Rugged Cross," which the vocalist at cowboy church in Lakeside had sung. "But

of the little things I kept out of the devotional called Our Daily Bread is cute. It says something like, 'Dear Lord, I thank You that I

I'm not good at remembering verses," he says, "though I have several that are marked in my Bible that I'll look at regularly. One haven't fornicated, I haven't coveted, I haven't sworn or said bad words, that I haven't sinned today. But in a few minutes, I'm going to get out of bed and I'm going to need all the help I can get.' "We both laugh. "I like to glance at that one, because it reminds you that everybody — I don't care who you are — everybody stumbles in some fashion or another. You're constantly checking yourself."

Serious rodeo contestants like Deskovick and Waldhauser travel thousands of miles each year to stay competitive. But for Waldhauser, the lure of outof-town rodeos declines as his small children grow.

"It used to be that I didn't miss anything," he says. "I used to do 60-plus rodeos a year. In the California Finals Rodeo, I was one of the higher-end guys. One or two other guys and I were hitting 45 to 50 rodeos a year in that circuit, not counting outside rodeos."

"That's every weekend," I say.

"Especially during the summer. And sometimes you hit two

for long. Another year, though, and she'll be able to go with me."

Waldhauser's wife Mindy has stopped traveling with him unless a rodeo is nearby because taking care of their children at the same time makes it too difficult. And having gone with him for years, he says, she got burned out.

Matt Deskovick has cut down a hectic travel pace of his own due to the loss of his best horse. He's done as many as 52 rodeos in a year. A normal year, he says, takes him to about 40 rodeos, and "from the middle of March until November, I'm gone every weekend."

"I go to a lot of the big shows," he says, "because they pay good. And this year was going to be my first year to go back to the winter rodeos and go hard all year and take a run at the finals. But that horse got hurt, so I stayed home this year and I'm trying to get some new horses going."

Deskovick does not have a girlfriend at this time. But, he says, "whoever I date figures out that I'm gone a lot. Most girls like their boys to be hanging out and pampering them. I'm driving 2000 miles a weekend."

"Does it seem that the guys who are married and travel that much have difficult relationships at home?" "It all depends on

the girl. You get yourself a good one, and they know what it's all about, and there's no argument about it. That's what they grow to learn. If you have the right girl, I don't think there's a problem. Plenty of boys don't have the right girl, for sure. But that's with anything."

hang around rodeos.

"That, dang sure, is nothing like rock stars and their little groupies. A few girls run around, but you usually know who they are, because they're at all the rodeos, and you see them getting with different guys. Seldom have I dated a girl that thought I was cool because of my doing rodeo. They all like it and they find it interesting, but I wouldn't classify any one of them as a buckle bunny. I mean, there are some, but they

aren't hard to stay away from."

"How many cowboys themselves are big partiers?" I ask.

"The boys are not afraid to play, I'll tell you that. I don't drink; I never have. And I'm not the big partying type, because I take the rodeo a little more seriously than some of the guys do. But I've seen a bunch of it. I've gone out to bars to hang out and be social. A lot of rodeo is a big social thing."

Waldhauser that one cowboy I met said that the rodeo crowd is one huge family.

"Oh, a giant family," says Waldhauser, "because you'll run across the same people in numerous places, and a lot of the time, you're all going in the same direction. And you help each other, even though rodeo is individual too. You and I may be competing against each other, but I'll do whatever I can to help you, if that means letting you use my gear

in case yours got lost on an airplane on the way there or helping you get set on your horse or telling you what your horse is going to do." Waldhauser is thinking here of his own event, bareback-bronc riding. "So you see it in rough stock, but people notice it even more in timed events. You'll have two or three guys using the same horse."

I remark that Matt Deskovick told me something similar. When asked whether he takes his own horse to the rodeos out of town, Deskovick said, "Not always. You can get on something. Like I went to Reno last week and I got on somebody else's horse, which you dang sure can, especially in steer wrestling. Most

guys don't own a horse. The way it works out is that, if you win something, you pay them 25 percent of whatever you won. If you don't

things you can't do is break the barrier. It costs you a penalty when you do that. Everybody's standing there and, as soon as you clear and they know that the barrier's gone, they're hollering at you, 'Go on, go on,' because that means you cleared the barrier and you didn't get a penalty, and, as long as you're quick, you're going to win some money. I wonder whether, when he goes on the road, Waldhauser finds the cowboy-church services helpful.

"Yeah, when I can attend them. They're done at eight or nine on Sunday morning, and you're either traveling to the rodeo or you're going from one rodeo to another at that time. Not too often are you there overnight or that you show up that early in the morning. But I always go to them when I can find them." "Do all the rodeos

Feighner Research Institute lot of them hauling their wives and kids around. When it comes to the rough-stock, you might see a wife once in a while, and maybe a kid, but not too often, because four of the guys can jump in a little Volkswagen and run off to the rodeo, whereas we have to take a truck and trailer and haul hay and make a big ordeal out of it. That, actually, makes it more convenient to bring family than it is for the roughstock guys. For them, it's easier to run around in a little bitty car."

Waldhauser, though, who is one of them, says that many rough-stock riders are Christian too. I ask him, then, whether he ever witnesses to his faith among the other cowboys at rodeo.

"Cowboys, in that respect, are closed. When it comes to rodeo stuff, we're a big happy family, but when it comes to personal things and personal hardships, people don't share too much. One thing I do is that I'll ask for a prayer before competition. I don't do

it with the team-ropers much, because they're usually scattered out on horses and getting tack and stuff, but when I'm with bareback riders, we're all in a small area getting ready to ride. So, quite regularly, I'll lead a prayer. Normally, quite a few of the guys will come over. A few won't, but a good majority of them will come over and they'll have a prayer with you.

"Also, whenever I'm done riding bareback horses — I get my hand out, and the pickup man comes in and

grabs hold of me and sets me down — one of the first things I do is say 'Thank you,' like that," he says and holds his hands to the sky. "That's right in front of the crowd. And they'll notice it. A lot of our top guys will do it too," says Waldhauser, who singles out one cowboy from Texas. "Good run, bad run, it doesn't matter; he gets up and says thanks.

"So with the coverage of television, people are seeing the faith that a lot of our contestants have. And it trickles

down to the other contestants. These other guys you're not seeing at the beer booth after the rodeo anymore. And a lot of them are starting to take their families with them, whereas they used to go by themselves a little more."

Waldhauser thinks that, in his rodeo life, the gospel helps him most of all to remain true to himself. He doesn't drink, and when he's done performing, either locally or away, he takes the first opportunity to go

home. If he has to stay overnight out of town, he sometimes accompanies his cowboy buddies to the rodeo dance or the bars, where he might eat and play pool. But at one recent rodeo in Northern California, he and several of his friends, after eating late in a pizza pub, "simply went back to the rodeo grounds and sat out and let the mosquitoes chew on us for a while."

The touchiest subject about rodeo today is its uses of livestock. Bob Harris had told me

that he didn't talk about animal rights, going on, however, to let his position be known.

"I noticed," I had said, "in your invocations before the rodeos, that you pray for the animals."

"Absolutely," he said. "Because they're athletes. These animals are professional athletes. They're bred and trained to do what they do."

"And they get hurt sometimes."

"Yep, we lose an animal once in a while too. But why would somebody worry about losing an animal when they're committing 1.5 million abortions a year. What has more value?"

Harris had told me that, if I was interested in rodeo animals, I should look at the statement about animal welfare on the Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association's webpage. That statement claims that, contrary to animals having rights, we humans have the right to use them responsibly for our own interests. This position seems to agree with biblical ideas on the relation of humans to animals, especially those in the book of Genesis, chapter 1, verses 26 and 28. There, among other things, God enjoins us to "subdue" the earth and permits humans to "have dominion" over all animals, explicitly including cattle.

I try to approach the subject of animals with the Ramona cowboys through the relationship that rodeo performers have with their horses. Matt Deskovick helps me out. "My good horse got hurt the day before Christmas," he says, "and I had to put him down a few months ago."

dogs, I think that I see sadness fill his eyes as he says this. But he presses beyond it.

"I grew up on a little farm, so I learned early that animals are here for a purpose. When I had to put my first sheep down and my first horse and dog, you figure out that they're just animals."

"But it hurts for a while," I say.

"Sure. I rodeoed on my last horse four or five years. Now that he's gone, to replace him is so hard to do. The attitude and temperament he had, plus the ability to go out and compete against everybody and do a good job, where I could stay competitive. You know, that's hard to find in horses." "What kind of tem-

perament did he have?"

"I could let kids come up and pet him, and I could put them on his back and ride them around. He was a really, really good horse. I have one right now that I don't even let people come pet, because he's not that kind of horse. And I've got another horse that I'm starting but that I can't let anybody ride. You can dang sure go

up and pet him and be his friend. He's not going to hurt you or step on you, but I can't put anybody on his back, whereas my other horse, I could send anybody on his back and let them go for a ride. They could ride around the arena. But this horse I don't even let people on him that I think can ride, because he's on edge all the

time, lots of energy and young. I spoiled my last one, because he was so broke and such a nice horse, and now I'm starting with all these new ones."

I ask Deskovick how good a horse must be for steer wrestling. "A horse is dang sure 50 percent, if not 75 percent, of it. If your horse ain't going to get you there, it will be

tough to win anything."

Chad Waldhauser is quite willing to discuss the ethical treatment of livestock, an issue that People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) has made a sore spot among rodeo aficionados. As a bareback-bronc rider, he starts with the bucking of horses and bulls. "I've got eight

8851 Center Drive Suite 300 619-466-8851 tells me, "and two of them on any given day will buck you off if they feel like it, and they're dead-broke saddle horses. But if they feel good and they want to buck, they'll buck. Bucking is something that livestock animals do.'

Still, for more consistent performance by the bulls and horses in rough-stock events, rodeos continue to cinch their flanks with straps. The effect is to make the animals buck more than they might otherwise. But the flank straps have to be lined with fleece to prevent excessive irritation. The rule is only one of many regulations that the Professional Rodeo **Cowboys Association** uses to govern all rodeo tactics for stimulating and controlling animal behavior.

I learn from Waldhauser how multifaceted the issue of the treatment of rodeo animals is. The subject merits a separate exposition. Among critics, the severest maintain that nothing rodeo does with animals is legitimate, since animals have the right to live their own lives free of any use by human beings. Rodeo responses to less radical specific criticisms, according to Waldhauser, fall into four general contentions. First, the professional association regulations in place are sufficient to protect the animals. Second, cowboys don't want to harm the animals by breaking those rules, not the least because they will be penalized in the scoring of their events for doing so. Third, to the stock contractors who supply animals to the rodeos, the incentive is to protect the animals, who are their livelihood. And fourth, the public is not educated

about horse and cattle anatomy enough to know what injures the animals and what does not. Certain events, such as calf roping and steer wrestling, for instance, give a false

Waldhauser, "and watch a calf turn around and lick a fly off the middle of his back. He can bend that far."

It is not possible to get the animals' own views, of course, but I ask Waldhauser, "Do you think that rodeo animals enjoy the sport too, perhaps the way dogs enjoy your playing with them, even when the play is rough?"

"You betcha," says Waldhauser. "Horses will buck you off and then prance around that arena and lift their heads up, like, 'Hey, look at me.' Some bulls are good at it too. A couple of bulls won't leave the arena until they make a lap. If you pressure one of them, he'll go to the other end of the arena just to

mess with you. But if you leave him alone after he bucks the guy off, he makes one full lap and goes out. And he'll do it every single

"We play by our own rules," says Selena

Roberts, executive director of Mountain Valley Ranch. Roberts is a small woman of 36 who wears a visor as she oversees, on-site, the frenetic pace of the Summer Buckle Series. "We're flexible with the kids, because we feel we need to be. We are not sanctioned or endorsed by the junior-rodeo state associations."

The summer series

"promotes whole-family participation, which is important," says Roberts. Mountain Valley Ranch used to include in its program more intergenerational activities. But complaints from neighbors about noise and bright lights late at night caused Roberts to eliminate some of them in order to end the program earlier than she

would like.

"We do have one team event still, mostly for dads and sons or daughters, the ribbon roping. When Dad gets the calf roped, kids have to run out and pull the ribbon off the calf's tail and run back to the fence. That's a lot of fun for them, because Dad and daughter or Dad and son compete. And

we've even had some moms rope with their kids."

"What is it about animals that's good for kids?" I ask Roberts.

"Unconditional love," she says. "That's a big part of it. I think that animals don't get mad. They're a little more sensitive. The greatest thing you can do for an animal is show it affection, and it will give it back to you tenfold. The animals rely on you wholeheartedly for their care. You're responsible for the welfare of this animal, and we promote that during our juniorrodeo activities. Care and concern. You take care with what you're doing, and the rewards come back. And you can see it in the kids. They love what they're





doing, but they take a lot of care.

"What's fun about this junior-rodeo series is that a lot of the kids that come to participate have never even had a chance to pet a baby

goat. And all of a sudden they're in the pen with one and they're hands-on and they're participating in these great events. And they're so cute to watch. I can't stand it."

One evening, at the Summer Buckle Series, I watch Waldhauser pulling his daughter, on horseback, through the turns of the cloverleaf barrel race. Amy is atop her father's Spot, a former bucking horse. Afterward, I talk with Waldhauser, who is holding Amy in the crook of his right arm and who calls the program "awesome." He thinks that

children become more "caring" through their interactions with animals. But, to Waldhauser, much more is involved. "I don't mean to be one-sided about it," he says, "but

it seems evident that kids who grow up in an animal-filled environment — and I don't just mean a dog — in general, seem to be well-rounded. When they're exposed to ani-

mals, they learn, early, life and death. That makes them more realistic. Things may not affect them the same way they would somebody that didn't deal with injuries or death. Their compassion may still be as great, but the things don't affect them emotionally, maybe, as hard as they do other people. Yeah, we are now talking about a person, let's say, but still something that you've dealt with all the time. "And, then, animals depend upon you.

Chores go along with them, whether you like to do them or not. They need to be fed every morning; they need to be fed every night. And, when the kids get older and enjoy the animals — they want the horse or the cow or the sheep — they learn the responsibilities that go along with them. In my opinion, a lot of city kids don't get that and, therefore, they have a lot less respect for things, including other people's things." Children respect

what they have had to earn, thinks Waldhauser, and a lot of city kids have things handed to them. If they are told they can't have something, they will throw a tantrum and get it anyway. Roberts brings up

another value that "we encourage," sportsmanship. "What's great on that level is that, about two weeks into this program, you're going to see these kids stepping in and helping each other. And the transition happens by itself, almost. During the first two weeks we're interactive with the kids and showing them and helping them and giving them the positive criticism they need, but, soon, you watch the older kids take over a little bit. They start helping the little ones. And then the

These kids work together. And the beauty of it is, you know five-year-olds aren't into competition. They're not. They're out there having the time of their life.

"But ultimately there's a winner at the end of our series. What we do is, they earn awards nightly. They get a first- through sixth-place ribbon and, then, they accumulate points throughout the six-week series. At the end of the series we have a final, and the top five children in each event compete for the finals. This is where the rewards come into play."

"At what point in the kids' development do they start wanting to be 'the winner'?" I ask.

"A lot of it depends on the history of the family. If Mom and Dad are involved on a competitive level, be it amateur or professional, the children get involved at an earlier age. If Dad's a calf roper, then son's out there messing around with dummy calves when he's five or six. Same thing with the girls in barrel racing. But we see a desire to start achieving when they're eight, ten years old.

"Do you see many tantrums because kids don't win?"

"Sure, the sportsmanship comes in here. That's something that we try to do for our kids during the summer series. Winning's not everything. You're going to lose sometimes. And sometimes, the more you lose, the more you learn. That's important, I think, for these kids to understand. Of course, you've got to try hard to win, but the chips aren't

always going to fall the way you'd like them to."

Mountain Vallev Ranch took some of its events to the Ramona Roundup Rodeo this year. From the grandstands an hour before the rodeo started, I had watched children in little boots and Stetsons engaged in roping dummy calves. But I didn't stay long enough to see the competition for best-dressed cowgirls and cowboys in different age categories.

"Our involvement in the rodeo was a test run," says Roberts. "We brought a couple of our events that were simple to move in and out of the arena. The idea was to invite kids out of the stands. You know, come into the arena and play. Everybody jumped in. And it was the best crowd they've had on a Sunday in years. I think it was because of the kids."

Besides the program for kids, Mountain Valley Ranch also holds weekly team-roping practices for people in the community. But although Roberts and others tell me that Ramona is "team-roping country," San Diego County is not one of America's oases for rodeo cowboys.

"There's dang sure not a whole lot of us," says Matt Deskovick. "In fact, my ex-girlfriend has no concept. And she rodeoed and went to a lot of rodeos and got a million practice sessions with me and learned a lot about it. But she didn't realize how many guys have been in the circuit finals. The top 12 of California in an event go to the finals. She thought that everybody goes to the circuit finals. And I said, 'No. Chad, Fred [Hyatt], me, and Troy [Dial] have gone.' That's San Diego County. Four of us have been to the circuit finals. I said, 'That's it.'

Deskovick remembers kids that he went to school with at Ramona High that he thought, then, were cowboys. "But when I started doing rodeo, I realized how far from a cowboy they were. These were people that listened to Garth Brooks and had a cowboy hat and wanted to think that they were cowboys."

"Cowboy wannabes," I say. "Exactly. You'll find

them also in rodeo. guys that can't ride a bull or can't ride broncs, but they enter up, because they want to tell everybody at the bar that they were at the rodeo last week. 

Miller's Big Fall

Don Bauder has just appallingly rewritten a chapter of early 1990s San Diego history in favor of former San Diego County District Attorney Ed Miller, who Bauder explicitly advocates be placed on the city Ethics Commission ("Can Ed Miller Sanitize San Diego?" "City Lights," June 12). Supposedly, Miller prosecuted white-collar crime resolutely in the 1970s and 1980s. Supposedly, therefore, "Miller ruffled the establishment's feathers. After serving six terms as D.A., he was defeated in the 1994 primary."

The "establishment revenge" explanation for Miller's electoral defeat is bullshit. In that June 1994 primary, Edwin L. "Ed" Miller was not only a sixterm incumbent district attorney (some outsider!), but he had run unopposed in his preceding three attempts at reelection! (In the race for county D.A., which is nonpartisan, the top two primary finishers face off in the general election.)

What *was* in fact the reason for an elected official with such a résumé to plunge so far from public grace as to wind up fourth out of five contenders, with about 11 percent of the vote, in June 1994?

The answer is quite memorable to anybody who voted in that election — two lurid, crazy, and highly publicized wrongful accusations spanning 1989 to 1993. They were the Jim Wade case (1989–1991) and the Dale Akiki case (1991–1993). D.A. Miller was especially active in the Akiki case: evidence showed that D.A. Miller reinvigorated it at the behest of a prominent local businessman after the deputy prosecutor originally assigned to the case recommended that charges be dropped.

Deputy prosecutors accused Wade and Akiki of child sexual assault; Wade was accused of kidnapping his eight-year-old daughter through her bedroom window at night and violently raping her. Each case led to a stream of newspaper exposés, and each — the Akiki case especially — culminated in grand jury reports scathing to D.A. Ed Miller. In 1991, the year Wade was exonerated, his case was replaced in the public eye by Akiki's. Akiki

was jailed in 1991 pending trial, where he would remain for 2 1/2 years. In November 1993, after the longest criminal trial in county history (eight months), the Akiki jurors acquitted him of all 35 remaining charges against him after just seven hours of deliberation. With that, there began a grand jury investigation into the injustice of putting him on trial, which kept the years-long issue of sex crimes witchhunts by county Child Protective Services on the front burner into the 1994 primary election season.

The exonerations of both Wade and Akiki became national news. Both Wade and Akiki sued the county and individuals, and both men won multimillion-dollar settlements. In 1996, the chief child therapist in the Wade case surrendered her license rather than face state regulatory board hearings on charges of having coerced Jim Wade's daughter over a 13-month period to falsely accuse him.

It came out in testimony at Akiki's trial that when the first deputy D.A. assigned to the case had recommended that charges be dropped, Jack Goodall, a part owner of the Padres baseball team and the CEO of Foodmaker, Inc. (the parent of Jack in the Box), asked for a private meeting with Miller to insist on the prosecution of Akiki. One week later, Miller reassigned the Akiki case to deputy D.A. Mary Avery. Avery was on the board of an organization, the Child Abuse Prevention Foundation (CAPF), that promoted the weird, wild claim that America was beset by "satanic ritual abuse" of children. CAPF's chief funding source, and Avery's fellow board member, was Jack Goodall. In the trial, children testified that Akiki, a nursery room volunteer at their church, had killed an elephant and a giraffe in front of them, that he had

sodomized some of them with toy fire truck ladders (without leaving wounds), urinated on some of them (without leaving odor) all down the hall from where their parents were worshipping. In the eight months of trial, the prosecution offered no physical evidence.

True, the grand jury's report on the Akiki case was released just six days before the election. But Ed Miller deserved to have that happen to him, and the mere timing of that report cannot account for the *magnitude* of his fall from grace among the voters. My conclusion is that Ed Miller (now aged 77, by the way) doesn't belong in any more government posts, let alone ethics commissioner.

After reporting a Wisconsin hospital for electric shock violations in 1994, being fired was mild compared to everything else that followed. Now California wants to take away my nursing license. My nursing career is forever at risk for doing the right thing. I have no federal protection or otherwise. There are too few of us because we dare to lose so much with little protection.

Yes, damaged careers and financial risks are some of the consequences, but the prolonged effects *years* of retaliatory consequences — is the worst hardship of all. And the effect this has on your closest relationships and your own personal mental health is another damage. Whistleblowers are met with hostility in the workplace. No one likes you, but they love to degrade you.

The best heroes are the ones like Kristin Shott, the ones who rarely are ever rewarded. Please make every whistleblower newsworthy, because we are invaluable to society.

n ordinary white bedsheet is the trap. A black light is the bait. The sheet is stretched out on a frame, and the black light illuminates it from behind. And the prey? Nightactive insects.

"A large portion of insects see things within the ultraviolet spectrum," says entomologist Michael Klein, who will set up that temporary snare one evening this weekend at the Blue Sky Ecological Preserve. This




attraction to ultraviolet is especially true of those insects that as adults

pollen and nectar. For complicated evolutionary reasons, they are our night pollinators. Fragrant white flowers are what they prefer more than anything else. And that's why the black light works. "The insect thinks it's a source of food, and it goes to the sheet.'

Once the insects are at hand, those who participate in Klein's "Insects at Night" program can capture them. Any lidded container will do. But Klein will also bring along nifty little plastic cubes, about one inch square, each with a magnifier built into its top lid. "Kids [and adults, too] can use these to see the insects blown up. And I'll be at a table, and they'll bring them over to me, and we'll discuss

group that we're running into right now is in the family Scarab. They're very diverse. Within that Scarab group we have a subgroup which we call the June beetles. One that people get kind of giddy over — and sometimes little kids scream about - is the ten-lined June beetle. Head to abdomen, it can be one and a half inches long, which is a fairly big guy. The larvae are mostly root feeders, but as adults they like to eat pollen, and so they are attracted to nighttime flowering plants. And if you hold one of these beetles and prevent it from flying, it has a tendency to hiss at you. It's completely harmless, but it does do that hissing, which is a predator defense mechanism.

Lacewings, another group of night-active insects, are

'underappreciated," says Klein. "They belong to the order Neuoptera [new-OP-tera]. The more common name is the nerve-wing insects. That's because their wings are very dense with wing veins that look like a ganglia of nerves." The species we often see in our region is the green lacewing. "It's a beautiful little insect, maybe an inch and a half, wingtip to wingtip. As adults, they're a light lime color, not shiny, very flat. But where they are important is in the larval stage, and that's where they're not given their respect.

'As larvae, their primary source of food is aphids. People think of ladybird beetles — or ladybugs — as being the

primary predator of aphids. But the green lacewings eat significantly more per day than ladybird beetles, and it's not a well-published fact." Are they not given the press because they're not as charismatic" as ladybugs? "Could be. They're also not as easy to farm as ladybugs - that's why they're less known. But farmers and gardeners are familiar with the benefits that lacewings do provide for them.³

Finally, participants will see Ihneumonid (ick-new-MOHN-id) wasps. "That family of wasps is mostly nocturnal. And they're parasites. They parasitize other insects. Ick.

"Well," says Klein, "nature does what it's supposed to do to survive. Their job is the same as any creature's." Plant or animal, it does what it does to perpetuate its species. "And parasitic insects are very important to us, because they help to keep in balance a lot of the other insects out there." – Jeanne Schinto

them.

Moths will be among the insects that are temporarily incarcerated, studied, then released. About half the species active in San Diego County are nocturnal varieties. "One of the families we'll run into is the geometrids [pronounced geo-MEH-trids]," says Klein. "When we were growing up, we used to call their caterpillars 'inchworms.' And one of the diagnostic features of a geometrid is that it has intricately shaped wings."

It's not true that moths are less beautiful than butterflies, says Klein. "Light pastel green geometrid moths are called 'emeralds.' They're very pretty. Another family we'll run into is among the more charismatic ones; it's the saturniid [sat-URN-id] moth family. These are the traditional silkmoths. They're the flashy ones very colorful. And they're very big. Most saturniids vary in size from three inches to as much as seven inches, wingtip to wingtip." There may be some of those at Blue Sky. "We have one species that is still out flying, although it's more of a springtime flier. It's called the ceanothus [see-an-OHthus], like the flower. Its wingspan is about four and half inches, and its main color is the color of dried blood — or wine, burgundy wine.

Get ready for nighttime beetles, too, including one that can cause needless terror, says Klein. "The main




A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond • By Jerry Schad

The "top of the world" views from Twin Peaks ridge are among the best in the San Gabriel Mountains. Sometimes in summer (and often in winter) you can look south over a low-lying blanket of fog or smog in the Los Angeles Basin and see Santa Catalina Island floating beyond the hazy dome of the Palos Verdes peninsula. The Santa Ana. Palomar. Santa Rosa, and San Jacinto mountain ranges arc around the horizon from south to east.

lune is a perfect month to undertake the strenuous ten-mile trek to Twin Peaks and back. Springtime lingers long at these elevations of between 7000 and 8000 feet, and the air is scented with the fresh fragrance of sun-warmed pines. Be sure to bring along plenty of water, especially if you will be hiking in the heat of the day.

You'll begin hiking on the Mt. Waterman



Find the homes by taking I-805 to Telegraph Canyon Road; Trail, which starts on the south side of Angeles Crest Highway (Highway 2) about midway through the highway's long and windy course between La Cañada and Wrightwood. Park your car at the Buckhorn trailhead, which is located at mile 58.0 according to the highway mileage signs (you'll need to post a National Forest Adventure Pass on your car for the privilege of parking). Cross the highway to reach the start of the trail.

Follow the well-graded foot trail - not the old road bed that parallels the trail at first — along a shady slope. After 1.0 mile of easy ascent through gorgeous mixed-conifer forest, you come to a saddle overlooking Bear Creek. The trail turns west, follows a viewful ridge, and then ascends on six long switchbacks to a trail junction, 2.1 miles. The trail to Waterman Mountain's summit goes right;

you stay left and eventually zigzag south down to a second junction. 3.5 miles. Make a hard left here and continue descending a more primitive trail to Twin Peak Saddle (6550'), the lowest point on the divide separating upper Devil Canyon from upper Bear Creek.

From Twin Peaks Saddle, the now-sketchy trail contours south to reach a second saddle (6580') at the north base of Twin Peaks ridge. From there, you simply go straight up the slope, dodging boulders and trees, until you arrive on the ridgeline between the two peaks. Climb a short distance east to bag the 7761-foot eastern peak. If you drop

a short way down to rock outcrops south and east, just below the summit, you'll have a dizzying view of the secret, upper reaches of Bear Creek's West Fork. Serrated ridges of shattered diorite, a rock-climber's nightmare, seem to tumble into the pit below.

If you are ready for a little more adventure before returning, go ahead and climb the 7596-foot west peak as well. The view south from there is even more vertiginous. Keep an eve out for Nelson bighorn sheep. Hikers signing the registers on both peaks have reported frequent sightings of these shy, elusive creatures.







Often, in dreams, he moved through a city not found in the real world. From one dream to the next he charted its streets, the texture of its neighborhoods. From one to the next, he recalled what lay to the north or south, its subways and bus lines, until the city became the place he knew best: morning light upon the storefronts,

All the Stops: The Glorious Pipe Organ and Its American Masters



Public Affairs, 2003; 323 pages; \$30.

FROM THE DUST JACKET: For centuries, pipe organs stood at the summit of human musical and technological achievement. Before the advent of steam power, electricity, and internal combustion, pipe organs were admired as the most complex and intricate mechanisms, save for clocks, that the human race had yet devised. In *All the Stops*, Craig R. Whitney journeys through the history of the American pipe organ and brings to life some of the colorful characters who devoted their

lives to its music.

From the mid-19th to the early-20th Century, organ music was wildly popular in America. Organbuilders could hardly fill the huge demand for both concert hall and home organs. Master builders such as Ernest M. Skinner developed elaborate organs with ingenious systems of pipes, stops, swells, pedals, valves, and keyboards, capable of replicating the sound and dynamic range of entire orchestras.

Power Biggs and the flamboyant Virgil Fox developed cult followings and bitter rivalries. Biggs — at first with builders such as G. Donald Harrison and later with others such as Charles B. Fisk — started a movement to restore to American organs some of the tonal clarity and precision that instruments of the baroque period had. Fox and his followers rejected that approach. Instead, Fox started playing electronic organs in rock concert halls to try to interest younger audiences in classical music.

While organbuilders and organists were fighting their battles from the late 1950s to the 1970s, popular audiences lost interest in the organ. But today, organs are beginning to make a comeback in concert halls and churches across America.

WHAT THE CRITICS SAY:

The *Dallas Morning News*: Lots of people imagine organists as a drab and musty lot, hidden away in their lofts, lost in arcana of fugues and diapasons. In fact, there can't be many professions with as many delightful eccentrics.

From *Publishers Weekly*: In this lively history of the pipe organ in America, Whitney, assistant managing editor of the *New York Times* and an amateur organist, weaves a tale of opposing ideas and colorful personalities. Pipe organs in this country were built much as they had been for centuries in Europe until the early 20th Century, when Ernest Skinner electrified their mechanical parts, thus enabling them to produce massive sound that could fill theaters and concert halls. In the 1930s, Skinner's ideas were challenged by one of his associates, G. Donald Harrison, who advocated a return to organs built with mechanical action. Harrison prevailed, and eventually Skinner was driven out of the company he had founded. Mirroring the story of the contest between Skinner and Harrison is Whitney's account of the rivalry between two of the best-known organists of the mid-20th Century, Virgil Fox, the flamboyant showman who developed a cult

following with performances on electronic organs (without pipes) in rock concert halls, and the more reserved but equally popular E. Power Biggs, who agreed with Harrison's philosophy. In the 1960s and '70s, Charles B. Fisk devised a way to build mechanical-action organs that could produce rich, full-bodied sounds as well as the bright, crisp sounds appropriate for German baroque music. Whitney admits that many important American organ builders and performers are left out of his history. But by concentrating on a few outstanding personalities and the organs they built or played on, he presents an engrossing story that should help fuel the resurgence of interest in the organ in this country.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR: The first of his parents' children, Mr. Whitney was born in Westborough, Massachusetts, in 1943 while his father was away in the Army. "I didn't even meet him until I was two," Mr. Whitney said, from his office at the *New York Times*. "My mother lived with her parents while he was away. My grandfather, her father, was a very important influence in my life. He was a schoolteacher in a small private school in Boston. He taught French and Spanish and German. He commuted every day on the train. From him I got both a love of learning and a love of trains."

Westborough, when Mr. Whitney was a boy, was a small town. Now Westborough, where Mr. Whitney's parents still live, is part of the Boston megalopolis. Mr. Whitney was a paperboy. He delivered the Boston papers — the *Boston Post*, the *Herald*, the *Record*, and the *Globe*, plus the *Worcester Telegram and Gazette*.

Mr. Whitney's mother encouraged him to begin piano lessons. He liked the instrument and he continued through grade school to play.

Was he teased about his interest in music?

"No, there were quite a few kids, and even boys, who were taking lessons. I was not very athletic — or not at all athletic, I should say. I was tall. So kids thought twice before they teased me." "Were you fairly skillful at the piano?"

"I guess I was. By smalltown standards. But I was not a prodigy or about to become a professional pianist, by any means. My mother loved jazz music. I grew up listening to big bands. She still loves that music - Benny Goodman and Duke Ellington and Errol Garner. She was a Sinatra fan. But I never was interested in jazz. They bought me classical music records, and I loved that music.

At 13, Mr. Whitney began to weary of the piano and piano practice. He was turned toward the organ when his piano teacher mentioned that the elderly woman — Annie E. Fales — who played the organ for the Unitarians wanted to retire. "Annie Fales," Mr. Whitney said, "was a town character. She had taught generations of people in the town. She was a spinster. And she was probably the town's best-known person and she was its historian. . Everybody knew her and had a great deal of respect for her."

Mr. Whitney became the Unitarians' organist. "I started studying the organ and loved it. I played services for the Unitarian church for several years for a lot of Sundays. But I didn't really start studying on a big orchestral organ until I went to Worcester and studied with Henry L. Hokans, the organist of All Saints Episcopal Church. That's when I knew I had to keep doing this.

The organ at All Saints, Mr. Whitney writes, "had brilliant, piercing trumpet sounds, a deep, roaring bass produced by pipes of the bombarde stop - named after an ancestor of the bassoon - that were, I learned, up to 32 feet long. It was nothing like the Hammond I practiced on, nothing like the little Ryder organ I played on Sundays. I was amazed, thrilled,

with their feet on pedals (essentially just another keyboard that

is played with the organist's feet). I recalled that my uncle had what he called "organ shoes," thinsoled black leather shoes that he carried in a cloth bag. I recalled, too, that Uncle Carl played scales and exercises on the pedals. His feet seemed to race up and down the wooden pedals.

"Was it difficult for you to learn to use your feet?"

"It's hard to make a living as a professional organist.... It's a shame that some excellent organists are paid as though they were

grocery clerks."

"Yes. I can remember starting off with socks, no shoes at all. When I try to do that now, if I forget to bring my organ shoes somewhere and I want to play, I find it very difficult to play with socks, because your feet are too flexible. I have flat feet, but still, it isn't easy to do.

"Once you learn the coordination involved, then it's not so hard anymore. It almost seems like second nature. But the trick is to learn not to look down, to know where your feet are without looking; once you get to that point, then it's easier. It's hard if you're trying to look at your hands, the keys, and the feet. That's distracting. When you start studying, you play scales, you play chords, you play with your toes, you play with toes and heels, you play alternating heel on one foot, toe on another. Whatever it takes to do notes."

"I would think sometimes one would wish one had a small child down there on the pedals to help out with his little hands."

Something like that had been done, Mr. Whitney said. "I think Anthony Newman did a recording of a transcription of Wagner on the organ at St. John the Divine in New York. I believe

he says in the record liner notes that somebody helped with feet because he had so much going on in this Wagner."


Mr. Whitney attended local Westborough schools through his sophomore year in high school. He did his last two high school years at Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts, where he continued his organ study and played several recitals. He went on to Harvard, where he studied organ more as recreation than as vocation. Mr. Whitney realized, at the time, that he was insufficiently gifted to make a successful career as an organist. "And," he said, "my father discouraged me. He said, 'You won't make enough money to pay the rent.' I think he was right. Unless you're very, very good it's hard to make a living as a professional organist. I think it's a shame that some excellent organists are paid as though they were grocery clerks, even now. But you have to rise to the very top of the profession to be able to make a decent living at it, and I knew I was never going to be that good."

As a college sophomore, Mr. Whitney worked for the Worcester Telegram. "And I fell in love with that as my life's work then.

He took his B.A. in French history and literature. "Certainly, I don't regret it," he said about his major. "It's been useful to me. I finally got back to Paris, as Paris correspondent of the New York Times. But it took me 30 years after I graduated. It went by like 5 minutes, but I was there for 5 years."


After Harvard, Mr. Whitney was chosen by James "Scotty" Reston to be his clerk for a year. Mr. Whitney recalled, "He used to go looking for young people who would work for him for a year. That was my graduate school. He was great fun because he'd let you do all kinds of things, including get him into trouble. I sent him off on trips to meetings that were actually a week later. And he didn't hold it against me. He was a wonderful mentor to young people.'

From reading him and from reading about Scotty Reston, I said, he seemed like a gentleman for whom the word "jaunty" was apt.

"Well, he was. He had a great sense of humor. And a twinkle in his eye. And he was very wise in a way that I've never thought myself to be. He had wisdom. He knew how to handle situations. He wouldn't get too excited when bad things happened. He's put it all into broader perspective and helped you get over it.'

"Can you imagine him at one of these current White House press conferences?

Yelling, 'Mr. President, Mr. President'? No, he wouldn't do that. What he did was go around to the back door and get an exclusive interview with the president. That, of course, was a different era.'

After his year with James Reston, Mr. Whitney, aware that



the draft was going to catch up with him, enlisted in the Navy and went to Officer Candidate School and did three years of military service. "Which in the end," he said, "I don't regret a minute of. I was commissioned as a line officer, but I never did sea duty except for short periods. I became a pub-

lic affairs officer. I wrote speeches for the Secretary of the Navy for two years in Washington. The last year of my Navy duty was in

Saigon. "In 1969 I came back to the New York Times as a beginning reporter on the Metro city staff. They asked me at the very beginning of 1971 if I'd go back to Saigon because I knew my way around there. I went. And after a year, they made me bureau chief. So I was there until 1973. And then I went to Germany for four years. I had also studied German in college and met and married my wife there. We had our children there. Then we went to Moscow for three years with the little kids.

Mr. Whitney also has served the New York Times as European diplomatic correspondent, foreign editor, and Washington editor. He is currently assistant managing editor of the Times and has

lived with his wife in Brooklyn since 2000.

Over the years Mr. Whitney has continued to play and practice. In Brooklyn, he practices once a week on the organ in his Episcopal parish, and he substitutes there for the regular organist.

When I was a youngster living in Manhattan, my uncle -Uncle Carl — took his sabbatical year at Union Seminary, where he acquired a master's degree in sacred music. I was living at the time at Union Seminary, with my mother, who was studying and teaching at Union. Across a quadrangle from Union was the glorious Riverside Church, where Virgil Fox played the organ and Richard Weagly (who, in the years before his death in 1989 in La Jolla, was chairman of the music department at the Bishop's School) was choirmaster. Uncle Carl, an organist, took organ lessons with


Virgil Fox. Because I was in the third grade and too young, my uncle felt, to be left alone, he often took me with him to Riverside for his lesson. My uncle was gay, and when he was in New York he was a bit more flamboyant than he was back home in Oklahoma. But Virgil Fox was about as out as any gay gentleman could be-he wore a full black cape lined with crimson silk, and he swished and pranced right out there in front of God and everybody in the Riverside chancel, and he called straight men and gay men "Honey." He was kind to me and let me fiddle a bit on the manuals of the Riverside organ and several times took me up to the bell tower, where he permitted me to pick out some tune on the keyboard.

I had mentioned all this to Mr. Whitney. He writes in his book that people who lived in the building in which I lived often

complained that they could hear Virgil Fox from across the quadrangle. I said that I didn't remember that. What I remember, I said, was that people talked about how Mr. Fox wore loud socks. Because my mother sometimes sang in the Riverside choir, I remembered, too, the terrible fights that Weagly and Fox had over tempi and loudness. Weagly persistently complained, correctly, that Fox played so loudly that the choir could not be heard.

Mr. Whitney writes that during a concert at the Washington National Cathedral during World War II, Virgil Fox wore his Army uniform. After the concert, Fox asked his page turner to hand him his cape. The page turner asked, "Sergeant Fox, Sir, why do you wear a cape?" To which Virgil Fox replied, "Honey, they see you before they hear you!"

"I wonder," I said, "why it (continued on page 100)

(continued from page 99) was that Virgil Fox wasn't concerned about people knowing that he was gay. That was unusual in the late 1940s and early 1950s."

"It certainly was. I think he was just unself-conscious about it. It was sort of a fact for him. And only that. It wasn't the way he defined his existence. It wasn't the central fact of his character or personality. It was one of many aspects of him. Clearly, he was secure. He wasn't afraid.'

All the Stops has as its plotline the conflict between the baroque organ and the electronic organ and between organists like E. Power Biggs, whose instrument of choice was the organ on which Bach might have played, and Virgil Fox, who demanded instruments that were more symphony than the symphony itself. Mr. Whitney writes about

this conflict:

The 20th-century American struggle for the soul of the organ was as passionate as it was because of the powerful and passionate

um

characters who personified its causes. Biggs and Fox, Skinner and Harrison, and later another influential American organbuilder named Charles B. Fisk — these fascinating men and their sometimes violently contrasting ideas dominated the world of the organ in America over a span of more than 50 years, in a series of collaborations and clashes that were as colorful as their personalities were outsized.

"Fox had grown up with organs built by Ernest Skinner and G. Donald Harrison from the Aeolian-Skinner Company," Mr. Whitney explained. "That tradition was basically one that made of the organ an orchestral instrument: one that could imitate the orchestra. You had pipes that could sound like the string section of an orchestra. Or just about anything. It's a bit along the same lines as a theater organ, but they exaggerated things like percussion and bravado in ways that Skinner and Aeolian-Skinner never did. But that tradition was that you could imitate the orchestra and even play transcriptions of orchestral music on an organ

and that was fine. Biggs, though, came to the view-and many people hold this view very dogmatically --- that the organ was perfected in the Baroque years. Everything that happened after that was a corruption. This group believed that real organs didn't imitate modern orchestras. They spoke clearly and distinctly and ...? "...played," I said, "what

Bach wrote." "Yes. They played what Bach wrote. What those people failed to realize is that organs have always had imitative orchestral stops in them. And they did then. They were just different stops, different instruments. They were for instruments that no longer exist, like the bombarde," which Mr. Whitney defines in his helpful glossary as "a powerful reed stop...named after a wind instrument that was a predecessor of the bassoon."

These organs were also not controlled by electropneumatic mechanisms. They were like pianos. You hit the key and levers led right to the valve that let air into the pipes. So they spoke more responsively. And Biggs and all those proponents of the Baroque ideal thought that was more musical."

In his glossary of organ terms, under "Action," Mr. Whitney writes:

The mechanism by which the keys make organ pipes speak. In mechanical action, "trackers" of wood or metal and other devices link the keys and pedals with the valves underneath that let air into the pipes from the windchest when notes are played; organs played this way are said to have tracker action. In electropneumatic action, pressing a key closes an electrical circuit that activates a magnet that works a pneumatic motor under the pipe and allows air into the pipes to make the sounds.

The most common electropneumatic mechanism is based on the pitman chest, a device perfected by Ernest M. Skinner that uses small discs with flexible leather membranes over the key channel that pop up and down under air pressure instantaneously when a magnet is activated, letting air into the pipes.

That the Fox party and the Biggs party dug in their heels so deeply over the definition of what an organ should be, said Mr. Whitney, "hurt the cause of the organ in the States over the years because organists got so dogmatic they were more intent on fighting each other than they were in interesting people in organ music. And to me, you know, a fine Baroque-style instrument is wonderful but it's not the only one. I can enjoy music played on an orchestral pipe organ. I spent last weekend in Philadelphia listening to the Wanamaker organ, and it sounds glorious. It's a fantastic instrument. It's a national historical monument. They're restoring it slowly. Now probably three-quarters or more of it works. It's beautifully in tune and beautifully kept up, and it's uniquely beautiful.'

Uncle Carl and his organist friends, when they discussed organs, spoke of the instruments as if they were speaking of people. Organs that they favored were talked about in the way that movie fans talked about move stars. I asked Mr. Whitney about this.

He responded by saying that a classmate of his, after reading All the Stops, wrote saying that he thought Mr. Whitney's descriptions of organs "made them sound like mistresses I was recalling fondly. Part of it's because organs are so uniquely different. No two are alike, unlike pianos. I'm sure there are differences in the way pianos sound, but a piano is a piano. Whereas an organ is not an organ. Every organ is different."

"What do you make of the fact that there's a resurgence of interest in the organ?"

"Well, I think some of it is the concert halls that have been built or are being built all have plans for large pipe organs. That's certainly some of it. Of course, churches are still putting money into building big, new instru-

ments. Some of this may be that wealthy people want to leave a monument to themselves or anonymously want to give a gift to congregations. But I think perhaps some of it is that the organ was in eclipse for many years and people are rediscovering it.

"There's also a lot of interest in rebuilding and refreshing old organs rather than throwing them away. In many cases there are fine organs that 25 years ago were looked down on, like the one in St. Luke's Church in Evanston, Illinois. It's an old Skinner organ from the '20s. Today people realize it's a beautiful orchestral instrument. So its day has come again."

Why did Mr. Whitney think so many organists are gay?

"They are, and I thought when I started writing this book that one of the things I'd do is explain why, but I honestly never did understand. I think probably not so many of them are gay as I thought when I started. But let's say it's maybe one quarter or 40 percent of male organists are gay. That's probably higher than in most musical fields. I've talked to several organists about this; I've interviewed them and asked them if they'd talk about it, and some have. And they don't have any explanation for it either, really. I think part of the explanation may be that a gay organist like Virgil Fox attracts other gay men to study with him, and then he looks after them. He makes sure they get good jobs. And then these people start teaching people too. But it's hard to make a generalization about why it is. I think that's probably a useful field for some sociologists to explore. I don't know. That's something for somebody else to try to figure out."

We then had to end our talk. Mr. Whitney explained that he was there in the Times offices to "put out the paper. We have a deadline of 10:00 p.m. for our first edition. We have already picked the stories we want on page one, and now, for the next three hours, my job is to make sure they all measure up. If they don't, then it is my job to find others to put on page one instead. Also, we take account of any breaking news, like, if something happens in San Diego tonight that should be on page one, I can put it on. And then we close the paper and clean it up for later editions, and I go home around 11:00 or 11:30."

A Century Without Bad Music

Where does a trio sonata by Georg Philipp *Telemann belong?*

Beethoven symphony belongs in a concert hall. But where does a trio sonata by Georg Philipp Telemann belong? Obviously, in the salon of an 18th-century

aristocratic house (the upper bourgeoisie will do as well). Something like such a house was the venue for a recent private concert of Baroque chamber music, generously offered to family and friends by a lover of

this repertoire, and performed by professionals from Los Angeles. The salon itself - we call it a living room here — could not have been more suitable, with its spaciousness, its handsome traditional furnishings, its immensely tall window admitting filtered afternoon light, and its cantilevered balcony overlooking the musicians from the height of two stories. The violinist (Adriana Zoppo), flautist (Anthony R. Brazier), and gambist (Frances von Seggern Bach) of the Los Angeles Baroque Players brought their own period instruments; but the group's keyboard player, William Neil Roberts, made use of the host's splendid (and rare) two-manual Kirckman harpsichord from 1758. To hear these musicians. with these instruments, in this program, in this ambience, was a privilege and a thrill.

The heart of the hour-long program consisted of three high Baroque trio sonatas, by Telemann, Jean-Baptiste Quentin, and "J.S. Bach" (I'll explain the quotation marks later). Framing these works chronologically were a violin sonata by Nicolò Corradini from 1624 and a keyboard sonata by Franz Josef Haydn from 1766. Stylistically, both belonged to worlds quite different from that of the first half of the 18th Century.

The little-known Corradini was an early Baroque composer of great skill and individual voice. His Sonata "La Sfondrata," like his other instrumental works (variously classified as sonate or canzoni), exhibits the imaginative daring and seemingly improvisational atmosphere of much Italian violin music of the period. But in Corradini the "stylus phantasticus" is tempered by a firm sense of structure and - in the works for several instruments — a particularly elegant and gracious deployment of counterpoint. The brief 'La Sfondrata" (the title is doubtless a tribute to one of the noble families of Cremona, where the composer spent his entire life) sounds at first as though the violinist is casually musing, this way and that; but the whole piece is cannily calculated to work up to the virtuosic climax (excitingly played by Adriana Zoppo at this concert).

Although Corradini's extant works are few, he is by no means a minor composer, as you may ascertain by listening to the praiseworthy CD of

his works played by the Aulos Consort (Tactus 580301). "La Sfondrata" is also included in An-JONATHAN SAVILLE drew Manze's sensational CD of 17th-century Italian violin music,

Phantasticus (Harmonia Mundi 907211). At the other end of the Baroque — actually

well off the end of it — lies Haydn's keyboard Sonata No. 13 in G (Hob. XVI:6). Unusual in having four movements (all but one of the composer's 61 other keyboard sonatas have either two or three movements), this early work already brilliantly exemplifies the revolutionary new Classical style — in structure, texture, melodic ideas, and harmonic movement ---- that was sup-planting the Baroque. Virtually no one plays it nowadays, supposing it to be outclassed by Haydn's more mature music; but William Neil Roberts did the audience a signal favor by choosing it (an excellent sonata that has no need for apologies), and by making such effective coloristic use of the Kirckman's double keyboard in his performance.

The question as to whether the G major Sonata sounds better on harpsichord (for which it was no doubt composed) or on fortepiano (which became Haydn's preferred keyboard instrument later in his career) is one that does not need to be resolved. Each of these instruments can bring out distinctive qualities of the music and it sounds wonderful on a modern piano too (as John McCabe's recording has shown).

The three four-movement trio sonatas on the program, all composed more or less in the dominant Italian style of the early 18th Century, and all full of charm, verve, and shapeliness, vividly indicated why this type of chamber music was so popular throughout the Baroque period. The typical trio sonata pits the imitative counterpoint of two treble instruments (violins, recorders, oboes, transverse flutes, or any combination of these) against the sturdy harmonic underpinning of the basso continuo (ordinarily played, as here, by harpsichord and viola da gamba). In this case, the treble instruments were the Baroque violin and the transverse flute, whose similar range and differing timbres added a pleasing variety to their interplay. Violinist Zoppo and flautist Brazier proved themselves to be vigorous and sensitive performers, in both the expressive lyric passages and the dazzling displays of virtuosity characteristic of the style; and the sounds of their instruments were attractively pungent and beautifully balanced in the room's lively acoustics.

There are thousands of trio sonatas in the Baroque, and it was much to the credit of the Los Angeles Baroque Players that they selected examples of the genre most members of the audience were unlikely to have heard before. Jean-Baptiste Quentin is an exceptionally gifted composer of the Louis XV era, whose works have not yet received their due, and the Third Sonata in A minor, from his Opus 15, ingratiatingly demonstrated how Quentin adapted the manner of Corelli to his own suave and decorous purposes. (You will find a fine performance of it in a collection by the Montreal-based Arion Baroque Quar tet [Fleur de Lys 3078], and further music by Quentin on Musica Antiqua Köln's "French Baroque Concertos" [Archiv 447286].)

One of the Baroque's supreme masters of chamber music is Telemann, whose G major violinand-flute Trio Sonata from 1718 was a highlight of the concert. As Anthony Brazier indicated in his useful program notes, this was one of six such pieces dedicated to Duke Friedrich II of Saxony, each of which juxtaposes the violin with a different instrument (including an obbligato viola da gamba and a cello). Telemann was a particularly enterprising composer in regard

to instrumentation, willing to try virtually anything, and justifiably confident that he could make the combination work. His versatility in creating ever new and delightful works within a standard pattern reminds one of Vivaldi, whom he also resembles in his inexhaustible inventiveness and exuberance. The loveliness of his slow movements and the sheer zest of his fast ones were well illustrated by this enthusiastic performance.

Even among fans of the Baroque, Telemann has acquired the reputation of being a superb craftsman and nothing more, a prolific routinier at a considerably lower level of creativity than his great contemporaries. This is a false judgment, as any fair-minded investigation of his chamber music will reveal. Fortunately, numerous firstrate recordings are available, among which I would recommend CDs by Pro Arte Antiqua Lip-

> If all this seems a bit much to choose from, then start out with the best of them all, Telemann: Concerti da Camera with Ensemble Florilegium (Channel Classics). If you can resist this marvelous group's performance of the Concerto in A minor for recorder, two violins, and basso continuo, then you had better give up on Telemann

> right away. As for "J.S. Bach," no one any longer believes that the C major Trio Sonata formerly attributed to him as BWV 1037 is really by Bach. The most







likely candidate for authorship of this expert but rather academic piece is Bach's pupil, Johann Gottlieb Goldberg (yes, the Goldberg for whose use Bach composed the "Goldberg" Variations). It is by no means of the quality of Bach, and far from being one of the great trio sonatas of the Baroque, but it is well worth listening to now and then, especially in a deft and meticulous performance like that of the Los Angeles Baroque Players. The truth is that one would be hard pressed to find any music composed in Europe between 1600 and 1750 that is not worth listening to. And in the right surroundings (such as the home where this concert took place), even a lesser Baroque composition is bound to sound good.





Fraulein Else

Arthur Schnitzler's stream-of-consciousness novella (1924) has been adapted for the stage. If it could find more dramatic correlatives for Schnitzler's literary devices, Francesca Faridany's work might

enjoy a long afterlife. Right now, even with stunning visuals and her top-flight performance as Else, it's caught between literature and live theater. Fraulein Else is a 19-yearold Viennese woman, lolling at an Italian spa in the Dolomites. When her father gets in debt, he asks her to request a loan from old von Dorsday, a filou (creepy letch) who wants something in return. Faridany plays Else like the besieged heroine of a 1912 melodrama, a terrific choice that allows her to express the myriad questions of a young mind. However, the play's form, almost exclusively stream of consciousness, gets in her way. The 90-minute script is scattergun talky, and Else's speeches have an insistent, almost one-note attack, which can wear an audience down. Fraulein Else is a play about broken boundaries, and Thomas Lynch's ingenious set warps spatial dimensions, providing the kind of visual correlatives the script itself could use.



Hugh Butternutt's done his lounge act at the Triple Espresso Coffeehouse 20 years to the day. While patrons sip a house blend — "Grape," "Scandinavian Blizzard," or "Mokoko Cocoa Mocha" — Hugh plays '70s tunes on the piano. He and his companions, here to celebrate Hugh's anniversary, got stuck in the '70s. The trio used to be Maxwell, Butternutt, and Bean, a comedy group that never went far. They're "losers," they admit, but not "ordinary" ones. And, hey, their reunion could help them face searing issues from their mediocre pasts. A formulaic story line? Yep. Straight from Forever Plaid. There's also the Forever Plaid problem: the three comedians are far too talented to play inept characters. One's a whiz at the piano. Another's a first-rate mime, and the third's a cracker jack magician. The trio is so talented, when the plot has them complain of difficulties to overcome, you wish they'd quit trumping up the pseudo-drama and get on with this highly entertaining, if lightweight show. (Note: the original cast members have been replaced.) Worth a try.

Guitarist Greg Ginn founded Black Flag in 1977. Along with the Circle Jerks, Fear, Bad Religion, X, and Social Distortion, Black Flag created the first SoCal punk scene. Ginn launched SST Records 25 years ago. SST was the first punk-owned label that made a difference, releasing records by such vital artists as the Minutemen, the Meat Puppets, Sonic Youth, Hüsker Dü, Bad Brains, and the Descendents.

Ginn/SST still owns 200-plus classic punk master

The first guy in line to meet Reed was in a wheelchair and had hooks for hands. Lou was holding one of his hooks and talking at great lengths with him. The next kid looked to be about 15 and was wearing a Reed shirt. As he was telling Lou how much he loved his music, Reed called his manager over and said, "Get this kid a backstage pass for our show at the Wiltern. I want him to come by and say



has an obligation to not just spread positive vibrations but also to speak out about injustice. That includes police behavior.

"They say they are there to serve and protect. I say they are there to harass and neglect. They don't treat you with respect. They feel as if they are better than you. I know you can't generalize a whole group for the action of some, but I haven't met a cop yet in OB you can get along with. Their actions dictate their abuse of power. Everybody in Ocean Beach feels this way."

The all-original Vegitation started as a fivepiece band two years ago and grew to seven a year ago. They have released one album, From the Garden.

Dandelion says rent increases have made it "harder and harder" to live in Ocean Beach. But the prices haven't changed the area. "If you need help in OB, there's gonna be people there to help you, whether you know them or not. When Daniel [Woodyard, homeless man

called "the Walking Man" who was killed by police] was shot, the whole community came together in protest. People are people regardless of their walk. There is still an OB. There will always be an OB. OB is a heartbeat." He said all the Ocean


Beach locals rose up over Woodyard's death.

"As a community, we walked by police officers, down to the beach to a stage where people united and rallied. OB is a family. I saw Daniel every day.... I knew he was harmless, and I knew he did not deserve the death penalty for searching for food."

Dandelion said all seven members of Vegitation write their own parts to their alloriginal music.

'Reggae has always carried a message, and that's why we have chosen to play reggae. Our music is our way of making people aware of what's going on.... 

you can, because we make 4- through 12-string banjos. So we make a 6- and 12-string, and they are corded and fingered just like a guitar.'

I hear musicians talk about the tone or the sustain. I asked if there's really that much of a difference between a basic model and a more expensive one. (Prices range from

\$299 to \$29,000.) Bridges started explaining as she grabbed one off the wall; "Here's

an open-back, basic banjo. This is traditionally used by people that like that old-time sound. It's done in a style called 'frailing' or clawhammer. It has a pot assembly or rim. This is made of rock maple and has a tone ring. We have some without a tone ring. You have a wooden rim, a tension hoop, Jbolts, an armrest, a tail piece, bridge, strings, a neck. Basic parts of the banjo. The sustain is relative to the mass. The more mass, the greater the sustain. When you pluck it, you can still hear it ringing afterwards.

"The tone is a combination of lots of things," Bridges continued. "The kind of wood — there's maple, mahogany, walnut. They each have their own sound. Maple is bright, mahogany is sweet, walnut is somewhere in between — very powerful but more mellow than the brightness of the rock maple. There is the tone ring. We have seven

different ones. All the different things will give it a slightly different sound — the setup, the kind of strings, whether they are light or heavy, the kind of tail piece, whether you hit heavy or strong. The heads you use. We have a black head, a frosted top, prism head. All of those combine to make the tonal quality of the music."

This was the first time I've seen a banjo up close. I mentioned that it looks like a tambourine with a drum head.

'It is exactly Mylar, which is what a drum head is. But this is made specifically for the banjo.²

When I held it, I was surprised at how heavy it was. Bridges said, "It's about 11 or 12 pounds. An acoustic guitar is only 5.

'Does the weight cause problems for your shoulders or wrists?"

'You should always use a strap, and if not, sit in a chair. It's a lot of weight to hold, and it should be held at a 45-degree angle. An armrest is also recommended. And as with anything, if you don't play it properly, you can develop hand problems.

Cream drummer Ginger Baker held his sticks wrong, and it caused such pains in his hands, he had to have shots in them before he played - according to something I read years ago.

Greg Deering owns the banjo company and started building banjos in 1974. The factory has only been in Spring Valley a couple of years. It had been in Lemon Grove from 1978 until 2001. For a few years they were in the basement of the old lemon-packing plant.

I asked Deering about the early days.

'We actually had our first three employees while we were still in the house. That's what kept the neighbors nervous — and [it was] a parking issue.

"Were you testing the banjos at 2 a.m.?" "No, we didn't work at night. We had a place in Encanto, and it had an old chicken coup. That's

where we had our old finish room.... I learned how to be a craftsman from my dad, building model airplanes and things. My friend growing up played guitar, so I picked up a banjo. I was at SDSU, and there were three other guys going to

school there, and they decided to make guitars. I was at the right place at the right time. They rented a building in Lemon Grove. I finagled my way in as a repairman and banjo man. They gave me a little bench in the corner. That was my own business. I paid 20 percent of my gross to the two partners. When Jan and I got married in 1974, and prior to that, I had a folk rock group. Two of the guys went to Madison High School. A new kid showed up to play the banjo, and it turned out to be Bob Taylor."

"The guy that makes guitars?" "Yeah. I got to know him before he ever built a guitar. When he got out of high school, he started working at this place. He and I were the only two guys who weren't pot-smoking hippies. When I left, they didn't have enough to cover the overhead. The guy that owned it sold it to Taylor and his friend Kurt, and they started Taylor Guitars. We started Deering Banjo Company."

I asked Bridges about the popularity of the banjo and if the movie *O Brother*, *Where Art Thou?* helped at all.

"Yes and no. We actually noticed an increase after 9/11. And then *O Brother* came out, the Grammys, and we feel like we haven't hit the top yet. But af-

ter 9/11, people were looking at things differently. They looked at their lives and thought about things in life they wanted to do spending more time with the family. And the banjo, a lot of people wanted to learn, and did then. You can share it with your family, sitting around a campfire, around a picnic, or at home. That return to family values has brought back a return to tradition, and the banjo is very much a traditional instrument."

'Dueling Banjos' from *Deliverance*. The campers get scared and drive off after hearing it. Many think of that movie when they hear the banjo, and as well as associate it with hillbillies. Is that a stigma you don't like?" "No. We encourage anything

that encourages banjo playing, from any standpoint. Different things appeal to different people."

Deering added, "In my lifetime, the only things that have driven the banjo market were the folk groups and *Deliverance*. Maybe a small bump when *Bonnie and Clyde* came out, because that had some banjo music. I'm in a group called the Lemon Grove Trio. The last three or

four times we've been out, we've gotten half a dozen requests for *O Brother* stuff.... If you go back to 1860 or 1870, the banjo rode a high plateau. The heyday of the banjo died out in the '20s. From the turn of the century on, it had a position in American music that the guitar has now. What killed it, dethroned it, was the electric guitar in the early '30s. It was the first guitar-oriented instrument that could keep up with the big band."

The first time I heard a banjo was my older brother's Steve Martin comedy albums. Has he done much for the banjo industry?

"He's been important," Deer-



ingsaid. "He hasn't done a lot recently. He is a fabulous musician. He could easily make a living just playing the banjo.... We have written a number of letters to him, and he usually answers them. We encourage him to use the banjo in movies anytime he can. He played one in A Simple Twist of Fate [1994], not one of his bigger movies. Anybody that gets the banjo in front of people is very important. That's why Bela Fleck is important. He's playing to people that would otherwise never hear it. One of the things he often does is take a break from the main music they play. The rest of the guys go backstage, and he sits at the front of the stage and plays it acoustically. When he plays at Humphrey's, probably 80 percent of the crowd has never heard the banjo live."

Speaking of famous people using a banjo, when was the first time that happened with somebody using a Deering?

"I went to see the Kingston Trio and got backstage and gave them a card. They invited me back to the hotel the next night. I was there an hour or two. Went on the bus with them. That is the band that got me started on the banjo in the first place. And all of the sudden, being in the inner circle was just incredible."

Deering said that the biggest banjo they ever made was for George Groove of the Kingston Trio.

"It had a really long neck, and we personally made it for him. Most banjos have 22 frets. On a long neck, they add 3 frets to the top. We make one with 24 frets that has 2 at the bottom. We developed that for John Hartford [bluegrass musician who died last June and did music on the *O Brother* soundtrack]."

Bridges added, "George's banjo is called the 'banjosaurus.' It has a fingerboard with an inlaid pattern with a dinosaur theme. The peg head has a T-Rex. The design was by Deering and Jeremiah [his son]. Thousands of hours of work went into that. There is only one banjosaurus, and it's currently valued at over \$52,000. But if you want

custom orders one, we find out what they're looking for, the sound they want, the look. They may want a certain wood or sound.... Here's something interesting about musicians: They are usually most interested in the tonal quality of the instrument and not so much flash. We are actually doing a few custom things now. Pete Seeger's grandson is having Japanese characters in the frets, similar to the ones Pete had done. They say, 'Peace, justice, freedom, equality.' And we have a dear lady having one made in all purple. The neck, the peg head, the tail piece. She's



one, I'll write that order up right now!"

Have you ever done a custom banjo that ended up not being much different from one of the many models you already make? Bridges said, "If somebody legally blind, and instead of dots on the edge, we have numbers in there, so she can feel them. She's also left-handed, so it will be a lefty. You don't have to be famous to have one made, just a wish."







Greatest Shines

"Some said I was dead, some said I was a truck driver, some said I was doing this or that."

e're still in Chicago, awash in the blues at Bob Koester's Jazz Record Mart at 444 N. Wabash, right in the heart of

downtown. I tell you what: I've been in California for so long I can't get accustomed to walking out of the bitter cold, wrapped up and layered to the gills, and into a warm, overcrowded store. Can't say at this point in life that I want to get used to it again.

Bob Koester, also founder and director of Delmark Records, an ongoing and distinguished Chicago blues and jazz label, was among those interviewed on the Chicago Blues video I discussed last week, as well he should be. He's the man who produced many of the finest sides ever

recorded of the Chicago blues, including performances by Buddy Guy, J.B. Hutto, and Junior Wells, all represented on the Blues video.

Unlike the Chess recordings, which were circumscribed and tailored for jukebox play,

Koester's artists were allowed to stretch out, usually with excellent result. Koester, a characteristically down-to-earth Chicagoan in manner, discussed the difficult

lives of the blues artists in the face of low pay, a dearth of good venues, the rigors of holding down a day job, and trying to get on as a professional musician in a town overstocked with good bluesmen willing to play for peanuts in noisy dives.

One of the best performances on the video was by one Floyd Jones (b. July 21, 1917, in Marianna, Arkansas; d. December 19, 1989). Jones is singing one of his signature hard-luck pieces, "Stockyard Blues," a deeply affecting performance and a blues that concerns itself with something local and topical, rather unusual in standard blues repertoire though certainly not unheard of. It's a tight, carefully constructed performance full of vocal nuance and economical guitar playing by a major blues artist who never really made it and confesses as much on film.

The liner notes on the CD drawn from the film refer to Floyd Jones as "Flayed" Jones, a typo, but an unwittingly telling typo. Not only is his song bumped from the collection, but the course of his career - or lack of one - is suited to someone named "Flayed," not Floyd, Jones. Raised on

> What might have been... Johnny Shines should, in the best and most sensible of worlds, have been part of the great Chess Records stable. But things didn't work out that way.

Well, I'll tell you, anybody that Chess fool around with, to me it seems like he was going to get the best out of it. He had a knack for getting the best out

of the musicians. See, I might have hooked up with 25 other companies, but I wanted to go with Chess. 'Cause he had the patience to work with a guy to find out what made him react, how he react, what he react to. Here's what happened. Chess had a dub on my record, he'd pressed it up, he had the labels and everything, and they call me to come sign a release on my contract. Okay. I go over there, and he ain't got nothing for me to sign. Well, this went on for some time. After about four months and nothing happened, I just stopped going over there. I told

Jimmy Rogers, 'You see why he won't release the record.' Well, Jimmy comes back, and he told me Chess told him, 'Look, we got four or five records out now that're selling. Muddy got a record out, Walter got a record out, you and Eddie Ware got

hit records. If we release this Shines's 'Joliet Blues,' it's gonna kill everything out there. When it gets so you all can't sell, then I'll put it out. 'Cause this is gonna sell whenever's it's released. And it's gonna hurt you now.' "

And that was that, until two years later when Shines cut a record with producer Joe Brown that Brown intended to release. Chess heard it was good and wanted to release "Joliet Blues" under the Chess name, and Shines, still sore as hell, told Chess to go stick it. Twenty years later, when asked about Johnny Shines, Phil Chess would mutter, "Johnny Shines? He was just a run-ofthe-mill blues singer.'

Oh, no, he wasn't. Shines was one of the greatest bluesmen of his generation, and the Chess brothers knew what they had lost. It wasn't on the commercial scale of their losing James Brown to King Records when Leonard's plane got held up by fog, or losing Elvis when Sam Phillips peddled Presley's contract to RCA, but they lost a treasure. And by not going with Chess and swallowing his pride, Shines's career was pretty much over before it got untracked.

Shines is perhaps best known for being a musical sidekick and pal of Robert Johnson, whom

he ran into in He-

Columbia. But as with the Waters recordings, they went unreleased until Pete Welding of Testament Records issued them 20 years or so later on Chicago Blues: The Beginning.

Shines's greatest sides were made for J.O.B. in the early '50s and are available again on CD: Johnny Shines/ Evening Shuffle. The first four cuts, including "Fishtail," Shines's reworking of friend Robert Johnson's "Terraplane Blues," make for hugely satisfying listening. The recording is flawed

and, among other things, the drums are undermiked (as are the rhythm guitar and bass for that matter), but Shines here is in the full bloom of his skills and vigor, age 36, an excellent vintage for a bluesman. Shines has a big, Delta-influenced

voice, of the volume and

don't give up much to the sides recorded nine months earlier, but I prefer the starker, raw character of the earlier recordings. They are, not just in my opinion, among the best Chicago-style blues ever recorded. But they would make Shines next to no money. While recording for J.O.B., Shines spent his days working construction. When he cut his couple of sides for Chess, he had a day job at a place called Argo Starch. From 1958 to 1965 he gave up the music completely, doing construction work by day and hanging around the

blues clubs at night, taking photographs. Shines would be "rediscovered" in 1965 by a British blues fan named Mike Rowe. Shines wasn't easy to find.

Some said I was dead, some said I was a truck driver, some said I was doing this or that, you know. And finally Sunnyland or somebody gave him [Rowe] my address and he wrote to me. Well, after he wrote to me I didn't answer the letter, because I really wasn't interested, and then one day the doorbell rings, and I open the door and who comes walking

Well, that would have been Mike Rowe. I'm sorry I wasn't privy to that exchange between a young English blues nut and what must have been a very skeptical Shines. Also, I shouldn't imagine too many wide-eyed Brits were turning up unannounced or otherwise at residences in black Chicago in 1965.

Rowe would not record Shines until later on, but Sam Charters, on a trawling mission in Chicago for Vanguard Records, dragged Shines into a studio two weeks later. Shines hadn't had a guitar in his hands for seven years. But the man rocked. Whoa, mama, the man rocked.



They don't give Grammys for "Best Unknown Band," but if they did, the Delgado Brothers might own a few. The Delgado Brothers (not to be confused with the UK-based Delgados) are an East Los Angeles Chicano roots outfit with fingers into R&B, Americana, funk, jump blues, and polyrhythmic New Orleans influences. Including percussionist Ray Solis and Dave Kelly on Hammond B3, brothers Joey, Steve, and Bob Delgado enjoyed a 13-year noncareer in spite of the buzz that surrounded their stellar debut release. Joey Delgado once joked to a reporter that the band would never make it in the music business because they looked like the night managers at El Pollo Loco. He was almost

right about not making it, but not for that reason My friend Michael

explains what happened: it is a story of typical music-industry buffoonery in which the Brothers were asked to cough up all rights in order to cut that first record in '87. Then, for whatever reason, the record wasn't promoted. nor was the band, and they both faded into obscurity. The Delgado Broth-

ers originated from jam sessions held in their parents' El Monte home, and

it was the success of those jams that first got the Brothers noticed. They remember a line of guitar players extending down the hallway, each waiting to take their turn one of them was David Hidalgo, who went on to Los Lobos fame. The Brothers mostly played clubs for little money and eventually disbanded. Only in recent years have they returned to the studio.



I'm going to see if I can get through this article about the Soledad Brothers without mentioning the White Stripes. D'oh! See, I couldn't do it. For starters, the Soledad Brothers are a blues-punk duo, and it's next to impossible to talk about such a band without mentioning the red-and-white kids. More to the point, Meg White played on the Soledad Brothers' debut album in 2000 and is credited as "3rd Soledad Brother." Jack White produced the album (if "produced" is the right word for something this lo-fi).

But the Soledad Brothers have their own shtick. Their music sticks closely to blues formula, even if it sounds as though it's been run over a couple of times. In that sense

The name comes from a group of black radical activists imprisoned at Soledad in the early 1970s. The Brothers use the Black Power fist and Black Panther symbols liberally. Do I need to mention that they're white guys?

Ultimately, the Soledad Brothers are iust another Midwestern blues-punk duo, and there's a global glut of blues-punk duos right now. Apparently, the Brothers recognized this and eventually added a third member who isn't Meg White. And lest you think the war on terrorism would temper the Brothers' radical chic, their new publicity photos show

Catch a Wave

"Wouldja look at that yacht!" said Lynne. "It's bigger than my apartment."

"It's bigger than my house," I answered. We'd just started sipping our first Blue Hawaiis on Buster's patio on the afternoon the June gloom broke: Salty air, soft sunshine, pleasure boats on parade. The enjoyment at Buster's Longboard starts at sunrise and lasts until moonset. Although Buster's isn't associated with Hawaii's Longboard Beer or Waikiki's Longboard Bar, it offers the same kind of fun, with a similar "aloha" atmosphere. Open four years in a former Jolly Roger's, the place looks a little ramshackle, like a beach-shack bar that's been rebuilt more than once and recently repainted. That's by design.

You can choose your own ambience. If you want shelter from the clamor of the barroom (which is right next to the patio and fully audible through the window screens), head indoors for the lower dining room, with its historic surf photos. In a party mood? Turn left to the bar, which has tables made of surfboards, half a fabled '60s-era VW bus jutting from a wall, and world music blasting loud enough that the patrons shout to talk.

There really is a Buster, who traveled the world surfing, supporting himself by working in restaurants and hotel kitchens - as busboy, bartender, line chef — as he roamed. Then he tried diamond mining in South Africa, struck it rich with a huge diamond, and came back to San Diego with the cash to buy his own restaurant. At every island and every beach, he picked up a recipe or two, and his favorites make up the menu at Buster's. Baja, Oahu, Fiji, Naples, Ocho Rios, Phuket — you name it, there's a dish from each of those waters. But the dishes are ethnically incorrect to the max. Any authenticity occurs strictly by coincidence. What we've got here is an international anthology of surfer grub - and like the storied surf at Waimea Bay, it has huge ups and downs.

The roller-coaster ride starts with the bread basket, if your server actually remembers to bring you one. There are brown 'n' serve rolls that look like King's Hawaiian (but probably aren't) and can be quite stale. A ramekin holds some sort of whipped spread. Yet the basket also contains delicious, thin pieces of Middle East-

ern lavash, with a fierce sprinkling of salt, black and red pepper, and dried herbs toasted on, like a Syrian pizza. You won't need the spread for that.

Once you order, you'll be riding the crest or wiping out, depending on your choices, the day of the week, the phase of the moon. An ebb

brings a pupu platter called "The Short Board," which gives your palate the short end of the stick. If you feel like hangin' ten, don't risk it — you'll slide off from all

the grease. Fried onion rings ("frizzled" rather than battered) are soggy with some no-taste vegetable oil. Fried calamari are Donald Duck's evil nephews, Chewy, Gluey, and Phooey. Tempura Coconut Shrimp are heavily battered in panko with coconut shreds, okay but overcooked. "Jamaican Voodoo Chicken on a Stick" is the jerkiest jerk imaginable: Satay skewers of white meat stuck into a pineapple crown, lightly wafted with the most timid, pusillanimous "jerk" seasoning I've ever tasted. (And by the way, guys, Voodoo comes from a different island. On Jamaica, this sorcery is called "Obeah.")

The saving grace of the Short Board (and several other dishes) is a side of fabulous fruit salsa, made of diced pineapple with mango, red onion, chives, and cilantro, all washed by the

fruits' own natural juices. With very slight changes between the two versions, the menu variously calls this "Jamaican Mojo" or "Hawaiian chutney." Either way, if the salsa

doesn't come with one of your appetizers, it's worth ordering as a side dish. It's that good.

For a *real* "jerk" flavor, try the shark tacos. The thresher "fish" chunks are "blackened" with a piquant spice mix that tastes genuinely Caribbean and packs a nice, sneaky kick. They're served on small, soft, doubled corn tortillas, topped with crunchy salad and a zippy yogurt sauce. Although the ingredients aren't the same, the flavors brought back delightful memories of eating "shark 'n' bake" on the beaches of Trinidad.



Or you could choose the "Barbados Crab Cakes." They're crispy outside, with moist centers livelied-up with fresh multicolored bell pepper pieces and corn kernels. Despite an overabundance of bread crumbs, their flavor is focused by a version of the good jerk-oid spicing of the shark taco and by that terrific fruit salsa/chutney/Mojo on the side. *Yeah, mon!*

For the highest highs and lowest lows, look to the wholly unpredictable "Catch of the Day." Depending on which evening you arrive, you could be in for a big surprise. The species on





hand typically include catfish, salmon, halibut, and some type of sea bass, in varying treatments and combinations. If you ask the endemically clueless servers just what kind of sea bass, they can't say, exactly, but on a Wednesday, our taste buds told the tale: It was a gorgeous hunk of gently grilled fresh corvina (a Baja sea bass with a distinctive, nearly steaklike flavor) in a lush butter and cream sauce. On a Sunday, the catch was a dried-out, tasteless white slab — possibly Chilean sea bass limp from the long journey north — in a hideous red pepper cream sauce that looked like prickly heat on a plate.

Just as red — but far, far

better — is something they call "Paella." Paella it ain't, exactly. Despite the short-grain Cátalan rice, it's actually one of the better spicy jambalayas I've tasted in town. It's full of big, tender clams, bay scallops, shrimps, dryish chicken breast bits, and (lacking either Spanish sausage or Louisiana andouille) hot Italian fennel sausage. The menu claims the dish is made with "too many spices to mention." No lie. That's what makes this such a tasty jambalaya-not-paella. "Pork luau" sounds Hawai-

ian — "seven hours cooked in banana leaf," says the menu. Don't look for Kalua pig: Here the pork shreds are moistened with fruit juices (in place of Hawaii's own Liquid Smoke). They're heaped atop a mound of jasmine rice amended by sweetened coconut shreds and Hawaiian chutney, the whole effect resembling a solid version of an umbrella drink, with a silly, sugary charm. Upping the sweetness a long step too far, "Balinese baby back ribs" are tender from parboiling and brushed with a syrupy, ketchupy barbecue sauce. "Wok-seared scallops" have lost all their flavor to the phosphate bath that preserves them on a fishing boat that stays out for weeks (I've written about this problem before). If you do order the dish, skip the ring of scal-lops around the plate and zoom straight into the center, which

features jasmine rice, shiitakes, veggies, and a scattering of friedrice noodles, intriguingly sauced with green tea, coconut milk, and lemon grass. Pizzas, which we didn't try, come with a variety of creative toppings and look nice and slim-crusted. Burgers look nice and fat, like those you'd expect at Waikiki or P.B. Here's another heads-up:

Instead of serving all the entrées with the standard San Diego broccoli medley, Buster's varies the fare with two recurring stirfries, both featuring red, yellow, and green bell peppers and sweet onions. The Mediterranean variant adds eggplant to the mix; the Asian version includes sharp greens, longevity

beans, and Napa cabbage. (The bad news: bland anonymous frying oil for both.)

Desserts are really the doldrums. Tempura banana fritters have firm little "burro" bananas encased in greasy batter, garnished with cheap-tasting macadamia nut ice cream (a private brand equivalent to Golden Creme or Adohr). I mistook it for cheap vanilla ice cream because, sharing with three tablemates, I hadn't snagged one of the three stale nuts. Coconut profiteroles had tough-textured cream-puff shells filled with the same dreary ice cream, this time coconutflavored, decorated with an ooze of Hershey-quality chocolate syrup. "Down-island bread not one of us would take a second bite.

Buster's is like the little girl with a curl on her forehead: when they are good, they're worthy of three stars, and when they are bad, they are horrid. Would I eat there again? Sure. I love chilling at mellow Seaport Village at the end of a hot day — it's near where I work and less rambunctious than a lot of the beach communities. And now that I know which days to go (never on Sunday or Monday) and which dishes to order — no prob. As the sun sets on my scenic piña colada, the tide comes in and the tide goes out, and the sea is still once more.





Mexican Teeth

he giant red, white, and green flag of Mexico flaps in slow-motion in the breeze above me, on the top of the hill.

This is just beyond Tenth and Revolución. I'm in TJ: Mr. Gums, heading for an appointment with

the dentista, my good friend Dr. Solorio. It's going to be an all-day happening. I figure I'd better feed up before I go in. But...in this spot, with its crazy traffic and tire shops? Truth is, someone had told me

about La Vuelta, "the Turn," an old restaurant up here. I spot it okay, a green-and-pink building

right where Revolución turns toward the bullring. I pop in. It's a 24-hour place. I check the menu real quick. But oops. Kind of expensive. I'm just walking away when I see another La Vuelta. It's across the road next to Transmisiones Continental. This one says "Tortas La Vuelta." Looks like a tire shop, not a torta shop. It's set into the hill. Couple of cars have parked right up inside it. I figure if people are that keen, it has to have something going for it. I cross and wedge in between the cars.

People sit on high stools at tile counters on either side, chowing down. Eddy, a young guy with his hair dyed blond, takes the orders. Three cooks hustle in the background. The TV hanging above the counter blasts out a show where people strip down to their underwear to win \$500. Behind it, all over the walls, they have so many items listed I don't know where to start. The basic torta



which is like a generous hamburger — comes in your choice of beef loin, carne asada, milanesa (breaded beefsteak), pierna (leg of pork), machaca, chicken, ham and cheese, or even vegetarian. They cost around \$3.60.

> Hamburguesas (beef or chicken) with fries cost \$3.40, \$4.00 with bacon. I end up ordering a mula, a kind of flap-over large tortilla with carne asada, ham, avocado, and tomato inside, for 45 pesos (\$4.50). Dang. This is one delicious mula. I splot a little of the red-hot salsa Eddy gave me. My

70-cent instant coffee (they hand you the hot water and jars of Nescafé, powdered milk, and sugar) washes it down nicely. While I'm here, mechanics with oil-blackened hands come in, along with mothers and children in their cars. Eddy says the place has been open 18 years. Their most popular torta is the lomo — loin beef. "But this is nothing here," says his friend, one of the cooks. "Go to the antojitos mexicanos [Mexican appetizer bar] near 5th and Niños Héroes. That's food."

Six hours later, I step out from Callejón El Travieso, mouth sparkling with new Mexican teeth. I cross straight into the almost medieval-looking Plaza Argüello, mostly known as Plaza Santa Cecilia. Okay, yeah, it's touristy. In fact, the whole thing is laid out as a tourist trap, with Mixtec sellers in the street, cantinas and eateries built with wrought-iron balconies, in the old style. But I like it. Buildings are

painted yellow ochre and red. Cars have been banned. The street surface is bright yellow with red bricks. They're trying so hard. Cheto's boxing club has been smartened up. Even the quick-time Hotel 118 has a fresh lick of paint.

Feel like breaking in these new Mexican teeth. And just about the first place I come across has a couple of signs that stop me. "Peligro: Nuestro cocinero se volvió loco." ("Danger: Our cook has gone mad.") The second says "Los Norteños." It has solid concrete pillars and terrace seating. I like it. I take a moment to look at the McDonald's on the other side. They're advertising McPechuga. Chicken breast. The light is starting to fade. The street's dozens of new old-fashioned globe lamps flash on. Now we're really talking romantic. Got to bring Carla down for a surprise dinner here.

But meantime, I only have \$5.00 left to spend. I check the menu. Ah. Even though you can pay \$7.50 for a meat Plato Norteño, or \$9.00 for garlic shrimp, there's plenty for us po' folks. Like \$3.90 for shrimp soup, 80 cents for a carne asada taco. "No no," says Joaquin, the elderly waiter. "Choose a carne or burritos. They come with soup and rice."

So I choose a *lomo* — loin — burrito (\$3.60). Make up for missing it at Tortas La Vuelta this morning. And it's good. The plate comes with two whole burritos, refried beans, salad with avocado, and rice, as well as chips and salsa. But the real star is the vegetable soup. Squirt a little lime in it and this homemade combo of potatoes, carrots, zucchini, chayote, and other veggies comes alive.

Joaquin and his buddy Gino and I chat on into the night as Plaza Santa Cecilia closes down around us. Oh, man. Ten o'clock. Still got to walk to the border. But it's not till I get up that I see the third sign: "Antojitos Mexicanos." Heavens to Betsy...Naa. Can't be the same spot La Vuelta's cook had told me about? It sure would explain that great soup. ■

grand-scale, framed certificate hangs in the Temecula home office of wine consultant Dr. Enrique Ferro. The paper was awarded to Ferro's grandfather; it presents the Merit Cross and the Gold Medal for Wine Ex-

position at the 1927 International Fair in Fiume to the Pasquale Ferro winery. The man doing the awarding was Italian Prime Minister Benito Mussolini.

Ferro's relatives have traced the family winery, located in the northeastern Italian city of Calosso, as far back as 1500. They

discovered that Calosso was a supply center for various armies during the 17th and 18th Centuries, when Spanish troops were enlisted to defend Italy against the French, who had an eye toward occupation. "Every time troops would go through," says Ferro, "they would give them wine. They were oppressed in that way for a long time. After the Thirty Years' War," says Ferro, "things got a little more stable." The winery remains to this day, producing wine from the principal grapes of the Asti region: Barbera, Dolcetto, Freisa, and Muscat Canelli.

Ferro's father studied at the School of Enology of Alba and got his degree in 1926. But by 1931, he was ready to leave Italy. "Things were getting uncomfortable. Mussolini was starting to romance Hitler, and many people were not happy with that." The American embassy told him there



was a waiting list. The Canadians made it clear that he wasn't welcome - Mussolini and Churchill were not on good terms, and Canada was an English colony. When a friend told him that Mexico was an easy in, his course was set.

In 1931, at the age of 23, he set sail for Mexico City, carrying with him seven barrels of Ferro wine. He arrived, found work in a restaurant, bottled his wine, and began selling it "to the most prominent people in the most important sections of the city." A few months after arriving, he sold

some wine to the lawyer for General (and former President) Abelardo Rodríguez, who had recently purchased a vineyard in the Valle Santo Tomás, some 40 miles south of Ensenada. The lawyer tried the wine and called the general, who commissioned Ferro to do a feasibility study for his Santo Tomás vineyard and its accompanying tiny winery. Ferro liked what he saw and signed on. The winery flourished, so much so that in the late '30s and early '40s, Santo Tomás began to finance the Russian and Mexican grape-growers in the Guadalupe Valley northeast of Ensenada.

In 1948, the elder Ferro left winemaking for management. "He started a whole distribution system for Santo Tomás, and he was attached to General Rodríguez's canneries." Under the name of Productos Mexicanos, they were selling wines, cans of tuna, brandy, and a vermouth that bore his familv name. In 1949, Ferro left Ensenada and brought his family back to Mexico City. But the wine stayed in his blood and in 1952 he sold his interest in Santo Tomás and started his own winery, Padre Kino, near Estero Beach. He owned some 200 acres of vineyard in the Guadalupe Valley, and the winery set about producing the wines of Ferro's native Asti: Barbera, Dolcetto, Grignolino — and brandy. "At a certain point, the wine industry had a shift to the production of more brandy than wine," a practice that helped keep things economically sound.

Young Enrique did not plan on taking over the family business. "I wanted to go into medicine, and my brother was doing economics." But "my father said, 'One of you has to be the winemaker. So without knowing what I was getting into, I went to Italy and studied winemaking at the University of Torino from 1958 to 1966." Upon his return, he spent a year being mentored by another Italian his father had hired before taking over the operation himself. He worked at Padre Kino for ten years until, in 1976, his father sold the operation to Casa Pedro Domecq, which applied the name to its carafe-bottled second-label wines. "Domecq didn't have a job for me, and my wife is American, so we decided to migrate here.

Ferro's first stop was Delano, at the million-case winery A. Perelli-Minetti & Sons. Like his father, Antonio Perelli-Minetti had brought a centuries-old winemaking name to the New World, and like his father, his winery was shoring up business by producing brandy. Ferro started in brandy and dessert wines before moving on to table wines, but he didn't stay long. A brief stint at a winery in Livermore was cut short by a call from Fort Davis, Texas. A consultant had recommended Ferro to help out making wines from a vineyard "at the extreme ecological limit of growing grapes. Normally, we consider the ecological limit to be parallel 52, which is near the Rhine River" in Germany. But in this case, the prob-

lem wasn't distance from the equator, it was distance from the sea — the vineyard was at 5500 feet. "It was exposed every year to hailstorms, and sometimes to very drastic cold weather during bud break." Ferro took over as winemaker and began consulting with other Texas wineries.

In 1980, however, he moved to Temecula with his heart pointed south. "I wanted to go back to Mexico. We still had part of the vineyards. I wanted to start again from scratch." Sadly, the economy intervened. "In 1982, the peso was devalued something like 1000 percent. I decided to stay here, because it's more stable." And over the course of the next decade, his father sold the family's remaining vineyards. Ferro, meanwhile, turned his attention back to Texas and to the surrounding wineries.

NORTH COASTAL

BUBBY'S GELATO 937 South Coast Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Center, Encinitas, 760-436-3563, This tiny storefront does only a few things (sandwiches, gelati, and sorbet), but does them exceedingly well. The "gourmet sandwiches" really do live up to their designation, with intriguing Mediterranean combinations (artichoke hearts, black olives, grilled eggplant, gorgonzola are among the choice of ingredients) on soft, round Italian bread. (Or you can just get a tuna melt if that's your flavor.) Gelati are about twice as rich as Häagen-Dazs, and feature an ever-changing array of bold fla-vors, e.g., vanilla rosewater and chocolate cinnamon. Open daily, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. N.W. (10/01)

JUANITA'S TACO SHOP ESTILO **TEPATITLAN** 290 North Coast High-way 101, Encinitas, 760-943-9612; also in Vista at 248 Main, 760-758-4531. Enticing aromas of fresh tortillas and fragrant frijoles greet you as you enter this busy little *taqueria*, where the food's cooked in the style of Tepatitlan, a small city near Guadalajara. Its local specialty is carnitas — which Juanita's does up (by the plate or by the pound) as tender, non-greasy shreds, served with fresh, cilantro-laden mild tomato salsita. Standard wraps are fine, too, and the beans taste as good as they smell. Try a "Flying Saucer" — it really takes off, with shredded meat, onions mild chiles, beans, sour cream, shredded orange cheese, and puréed guacamole riding high on an airy crisped flour tortilla. Quick and good, open daily, three meals until 2 a.m. Inexpensive. — N.W. (9/01)

KEALANI'S 137 West D Street, Encini-tas, 760-94-ALOHA. Tucked between a 7-Eleven and a pizzeria, with an ex-terior sign that says "Saimin" (for Hawaii's version of Top Ramen), this island of the Islands prescribes "Living Da Aloha Spirit." A ukulele player sometimes serenades the noonday crowd at the sidewalk tables, and at any hour the food is "plate lunch" — two scoops of short-grain rice, mild house-made macaroni salad, and a choice of authentic "grines." Don't miss the out-standing kalua pig, zesty, smoky shreds of *imu*-style roast pork, resembling a moister version of Southern "pulled pork." The menu covers the whole panoply of island standards, from malasadas (Portuguese donuts) to musubi (Spam sushi), with a Saturday special of a luau's worth of "local food." While you're waiting, check out the droll Hawaiian vocabulary lessons under the glass tops of the tables. Open Monday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. N.W. (10/01)

LA BONNE BOUFFE 471 Encinitas Boulevard, Town and Country Shop-ping Center, Encinitas, 760-436-3081. Boeuf Bourguignon, rack of lamb, frog's legs (when available), duck in peppercorn sauce, and Dover sole in lemon-butter sauce are the staples of this French provincial restaurant. Din ners are à la carte. Charming room and sensitive wine list. Dinner Tuesday

through Sunday, Reservations for weekend dinners advised. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

NEIMANS 300 Carlsbad Village Drive (at Carlsbad Boulevard), Carlsbad, 760-729-4131. Set in a Victorian gingerbread mansion overlooking High-way 101, this hotel-restaurant's best deal is the Sunday all-you-can-eat-anddrink champagne brunch, featuring made-to-order omelets, seafood creations, mimosas, etc., moderately priced for a day's worth of protein, calories, and buzz. No brunch reservations, so expect a wait. (Holiday brunch prices are much higher, but then they do take reservations.) After dark, the site is basically a nightclub, with a younger crowd scarfing up traditional American fare, priced high, until mid-night or later. Open daily, lunch and dinner. — E.W.

ROXY NATURAL FOODS RESTAU-RANT 517 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-436-5001. You don't have to be a Self Realization Fellowship follower to fit in in Encinitas, but it helps. Roxy was made for the veggie crowd who've grown up around the famous seaside compound. These days, that includes surfers, vegans, and even visiting Hollywood stars picky about their food. Actually, it is no longer strictly a vegetarian eatery: the owners have added chicken and fish for Encinitas's "new people" — the carnivores buying up property in the hills. But the vegan-veggie spirit still rules. Most popular item on the menu is owner Shahram Naimi's own invention: the scrumptious Roxy falafelburger. Its green "meat" is made from garbanzo beans, potatoes, onions, cilantro, and herbs, all bedded down with tomatoes, a thick mat of sprouts, and melted cheese, covered by a whole-wheat bun. For chicken-lovers, the garlic chicken pizzas sell big-time. Other healthy treats include the three-egg avocado omelet with toast, the artichoke sandwich (with marinated artichoke hearts), and the squash enchilada din-ner (steamed banana squash with corn, bell peppers, and low-fat cream cheese in a flower tortilla). Payoff? You come out feeling good and full, not bad and bloated. Open daily, brunch through dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

ST. GERMAIN'S CAFE 1010 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-753-5411. Despite the Parisian name, the food here is all-American. Omelets are the café's best-known dish — 14 variations of three-eggers (or Eggbeaters by request) served with toast or a muffin, plus tasty herb-strewn "café potatoes" or fresh fruit salad. But don't overlook the Belgian waffles, scrambles, pancakes, Louisiana sausages, or the three versions of expertly poached eggs Benedict with genuine hollandaise. Sandwiches run to hearty American classics (including some veg choices), and along with beef burgers, turkey burgers, and veggie burgers, there are no fewer than six twists on lean charbroiled chicken breast on a burger bun. The sheltered patio is always crowded, but there's a large interior dining room with a separate smoothies-and-ice-cream bar. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. - N.W. (10/01)

ST. TROPEZ 947 South Coast Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Center #103D, Encinitas, 760-633-0084, If you love continental breakfast, this bright café with indoor-outdoor seating offers scores of house-baked pas-tries (among them the rare, elusive brioche) and four styles of coffee, including an excellent French roast. You get what you pay for at one of San Diego County's premiere dining destina-tions — stunning new French cuisine in a lovely, civilized room. The left side of the menu lists traditional golf-and-tennis-folk favorites (lobster bisque, filet mignon), but the right side is a daily changing array of creative dishes by chef Patrick Ponsaty, including a five-course tasting menu. These dishes are not merely luxurious, they're thrilling, with flavor combinations that are intense and balanced, audacious and refined. The wine list is awesome and pricey, with numerous half-bottles. Dress rules aside, the atmosphere is anything but stuffy: A charming room captain puts you at ease and servers are pleasantly attentive. It's ideal for a special night out - and the Sunday brunches are lavish, too. Jacket re-quired, ties usual, women's attire chic or prosperously dowdy. Reservations essential. The refried beans are as good as they get. Actually, they keep the price of breakfasts — like two "plain and simple" steamed eggs with fresh fruit and toast, or the "Popeye" omelet, with spinach, Parmesan cheese, prosci-utto ham, and diced tomato, fruit, and

toast - down to a small roar. Course, everybody in this neck of the woods is trying not to eat, so expect lots of fruit plates and healthy lunch sandwiches like roasted eggplant with zucchini, bell peppers, tomatoes, and mozzarella. Non-beef entrées include fish, seafood, veal chop, pork chop, or a delicate Aus-tralian rack of lamb. Unlike many steakhouses where your money buys only the meat, entrées are served with vegetables and potato. Additional à la carte sides include creamed spinach and sautéed mushrooms. Among the house-made desserts the highlights are a light, creamy cheesecake with fresh strawberry sauce and a traditional creme brûlée. IKEA RESTAURANT & CAFE 2149 Fenton Parkway, Mission Valley, 619-283-6166, ext.1200. Central shrine for San Diego's 10,000 Swedes, so they say. They come to taste open-faced sandwiches, salmon, shrimp, and meat-balls again. This restaurant inside Sweden's wildly successful "home interi ors" chain is a great intro to Swedish tastes. The food's more sensible than exciting, of course. But healthy - beef and pork for the meatballs are guaran teed hormone-free. You eat the meatballs with Swedish lingonberry (not cranberry) sauce. Fish is big: the shrimp open-faced sandwich, the salmon plate with potatoes and broccoli, and the Gravad Lox Plate (cured salmon), are always on. And if you want to be disgustingly healthy, chew on their fresh vegetable plate (raw carrot sticks, cauliflower, garbanzo beans, and mushrooms). All for a song. The only health hazard: hordes of babies and kids romping in the restaurant's mother-friendly play area. Inexpensive. -E.B.(5/02)

TODAI 2828 Camino Del Rio South Mission Valley, 619-299-8996. You'll find no dish "to die" for at this So-Cal based chain restaurant. It calls itself "The Mother of All Seafood Buffets" and has spawned branches in subur-ban malls all over the country. Our branch looks like a seafood Disney-land — multicolor floors and pastel neon lights in fanciful shapes (moon, stars, fish) adorn three separate buffets. There's a huge array of seafood, sushi, teppanyaki, and assorted Asian nibbles — some pretty good, some pretty awful (e.g., "Dungeon" crab cooked to mush). They do rotate the dishes reg-ularly until a half hour before serving. keeping most items reasonably fresh Two vast, drab dining rooms (seating 500) feature strong, dingy lighting and utilitarian tables and chairs closely spaced to seat the crowded masses Japanese beers, California jug wines, eneric hot and cold sake available generic hot and cold sake and Reservations for large groups only. Family atmosphere, very noisy. Arrive early to cover the territory. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate, with kiddie and senior discounts. — N.W. (10/02)

TOFU HOUSE 4646 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 619-576-6433. Also at 3805 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-291-4406. This stylish little pair of eateries is proof positive that our city has matured for its specialty ethnic foods. Tofu House is a Korean restaurant serving up specialty tofu dishes. THE AUSTRALIAN PUB 1014 Grand Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-273-9921. A great place to take your kids after a morning at the beach. This relaxing pub, owned by a true-blue Aussie, of-fers heaps of good Aussie food. Try the Road Kill (grilled chicken breast with pico de gallo sauce and cheese "run over" between 2 pieces of sourdough) or the Aussie Burger (1/2-pound patty with a fried egg, cheese, bacon, grilled onions, beets, pineapple, and a side of steak fries). And for an "outback experience," order up Vegemite (a beefy kinda paste) and four slices of bread it's the Aussie national food, mate.



Cordial owner-host Javier Gonzalez opened this charming restaurant so that local Spaniards would have a place to gather with an authentic atmosphere of home, and indeed, the "Euro" atmosphere and late hours give a truly Iberian feel. The lively garlic-rich dishes here include a wide array of tasty tapas and, among the entrées, a paella that's made to order (sized to serve two or four; call ahead for larger groups). Patio seating in good weather. Parking lot and wheelchair access via the alley behind the restaurant. Open daily 11 a.m. to midnight, with bargain prices at Sunday brunch. FRENCH GOURMET 960 Turquoise Street, Pacific Beach, 858-488-1725. This pleasant, airy dining room serves French food with California influences It's light, good-tasting, and easy on your purse. GRINGO'S 4474 Mission Boulevard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-490-2877. With better cooking than you'd guess from its name, this ambitious spin-off of the local Moon-doggies chain serves the sort of Mexican cuisine you might find at a seaside resort in Cabo or Puerto Vallarta — skillfully prepared with good, fresh ingredients, just a bit dumbed-down in the flavors. The chile verde, say, is beautifully seasoned if barely picante, and the luscious *camarones borrachos* are big white shrimp cooked just till done and not a moment more. Given the surefire location at the hub of PB partytown, the food is actually better than it needs to be. A vast list of tequilas, interesting margaritas, and a sensible wine list emphasizing affordable, foodfriendly Chilean bottlings add to the draw for a lively young crowd that revs the decibels to a roar on weekends. LAMONT STREET GRILL 4445 Lamont Street (between Grand and Garnet), Pacific Beach. 858-270-3060. The interior's low wood-slat ceilings, driftwood beams, dim light, and red-leather booths combine with the stay-up-late kitchen to make the space feel like a cozy haven, a respite from the brighter buzz of Mission Beach. The wine list runs the gamut from Cook's sparkling wine to Cristal champagne, stopping along the way at an interesting (if expensive) collection of reserves. Next door is the restaurant's serviceable sushi bar (858-488-7255) and twostory patio dining. Open seven days; lunch weekdays, brunch and lunch weekends; dinner until 1 a.m. weeknights, 2 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Sushi bar open nightly, 5:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. Moderate. — *A.M. (8/02)* UMI SUSHI 2806 Shelter Island Drive (at Shafter, off Scott), Point Loma, 619-226-1135. An instant neighbor-hood success, this large, cheerful sushi bar and dinner house also offers Japanese and Korean entrées, including



teppanyaki (cooked in the kitchen, not at the table), Korean ribs, and excellent beef teriyaki of gently grilled prime beef. Sushi highlights include lemony *ama ebi*, rich garlic tuna, and a "Crazy Boy" roll spicy enough to divert your palate from the presence of imitation crabmeat. Free parking lot (often full). Special kids' menu available. Lunch and dinner daily. Sushi prices lower than most; entrées inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

CHICKEN PIE SHOP OF SAN DIEGO 2633 El Cajon Boulevard, North Park, 619-295-0156 How much do people love this place? Count the chickens lining the walls - ceramic, wood, beaded, painted, even feathered. Hundreds. They're gifts from generations of customers. Now, as in the 1930s when it started up, the basic chicken pie comes filled with big chunks of chicken meat, doused with white gravy and accompanied by mashed potatoes, veggies, coleslaw, a roll, *and* dessert — like the delicious pineapple pie — all for one really low price. From the complexity of grilled salmon over pea greens, baby lettuces, sticky rice, and jicama slaw, to the tradition of lamb loin, Kensington Grill proves a talented, hardworking kitchen. OLD MILL CAFE 3949 Ohio Street (at University Avenue), North Park, 619-294-3804. The best-kept secret in North Park looks like a Swiss chalet inside, but serves 1950s American eats in big platefuls. Breakfast buffs should check out the pork chops with two eggs, potatoes, and toast, or biscuits and gravy, or the famous pigs in a blanket (three sausage links rolled in hot cakes (three sausage links roled in not cakes with powdered sugar). The lunch and dinner menu is also good and cheap — for instance, golden fried chicken with vegetables and rice or baked potato. They feature nightly prix fixe specials ("Meatloaf Mondays," etc.) just like Mom did in the 1950s. Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

PEKIN RESTAURANT 2877 University Avenue (near 30th Street), North Park, 619-295-2610. This old-time Chinese eatery was founded in 1931 by an immigrant from Canton; his grand-children now run it and it's hardly changed in 70 years. You'll find redtasseled hanging lanterns with translu-cent pictures of songbirds, mother-ofpearl wall decorations, and big cushioned booths. The food is Gold Rush-era Cantonese-American: chop suey, chow mein, barbecued pork, bean cake with shrimp and rice — all for a song. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner Saturdays. Closed Tuesdays. Inex-pensive. — E.B. (11/00)

spicy) Ethiopian cuisine, served communally on a tray lined with a porous pancake, *injera*, which looks like an edible dish towel and serves as both an edible spoon and an edible tablecloth. (Use pieces of it to scoop up morsels in your right hand.) The meat combination platter here isn't nearly as exciting as several of the specialties. The *kitfo* (spicy beef tartare) is very good, the *gored-gored* (meat cubes in spicy butter) is excellent; both are cooked (or not cooked) to your order, and seasoned to your specifications (if you say "hot," expect fire). Vegetables are fine, too; the yellow split peas, especially, sing with flavor. Rest rooms not wheelchair-accessible. Vegetarianfriendly. Can be noisy on weekend evenings. Open daily. Very inexpensive. — N.W. (12/00)

RIB MASTERS EXPRESS 4297 Market Street (at 43rd Street), Chollas View, 619-262-7993. They split Hermie's Market to create this Chicagostyle BBQ, New Orleans-style Southern food joint. It started off short on facilities (like no tables), but long on great food. This is the baby of Tony Seales, the San Diego pro heavyweight boxer. Tony's originally from Chicago. He knows ribs, and he invented his own BBQ sauce recipe; even his employees don't know the formula. But try it on cheap deals like the BBQ chicken sandwich. Add other great deals like collard greens, red beans and rice, jambalaya, spicy spaghetti, sweet potato pie, macaroni and cheese, and that oh-so-delicious peach cobbler. Then, of course, there's the ribs themselves. Everything available "to go." Lunch to early dinner, seven days. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *E.B. (10/02)*

EAST COUNTY & STATE COLLEGE

IIMMY'S 9635 Mission Gorge Road (at Town Center Drive), Santee, 619-448-8994. We're at the end of the line here, the trolley's Orange Line. Feels like a safari. You walk back through the grass to the streets of Santee. Thank goodness for this family-friendly restaurant with good, old-fashioned American food. Their six-page plastic menu tells all — forget your diet and dig into the breakfast "Eggs and Cakes" (two eggs, three pancakes), the "Touchdown" (two eggs, two hotcakes, four strips of bacon or three link sausages), or the "Monte Cristo" hot sandwich (ham and turkey grilled on batter-dipped Texas toast with Swiss cheese, hot syrup, and French fries). Later in the day, the New York strip or sirloin steak with all the trimmings, and desserts like homemade cinnamon bread pudding with raisins and whipped cream. Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00) SALA THAI 6161 El Cajon Boulevard, Campus Plaza, College Area, 619-229-9050. You will find this Thai restaurant as charming as its owner. The menu is extensive, the service attentive. Try the spicy seafood combi-nation or the Chinese specialties. A delightful, gastronomically satisfying experience. Open Monday through Saturday for lunch and dinner; Sunday dinner only. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *E.W.*

SHAM ROCKS SHACK BAR & GRILL 7059 El Cajon Boulevard (at 70th Street), La Mesa, 619-463-2263. It has the feel of a pub: nice solid-wood furniture, pool tables, dart boards, big open kitchen in back. Most of all, people know each other. As for the food — yes, there's a little bit of Ireland, like the corned beef sandwiches, but mostly it's all-American pre-health-craze cholesterol city. Denver egg omelets with home fries, Philly cheese steaks, spaghetti and garlic bread, hamburg-ers, jalepeño poppers, steak and eggs, and of course fish and chips. Presentation's old-fashioned, too: heavy white dinner china plates and sturdy cutlery, as long as you agree to "please don't steal the forks." But Irish? Well, think James Joyce on a surfboard. Food from noon to 8 p.m., Sunday special brunch from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Kitchen is closed

on Mondays; the bar is open. In expensive. — E.B. (5/02)

TOSHI SUSHI 5943 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-287-3536. Don't ask what's in the "dynamite" sauce (besides the obvious mayo and smelt roe) — it's a house secret, one the restaurant dangles before you in numerous contexts. Try it baked onto the rich, everything-goes Garbage Roll, where deep-fried shrimp, freshwater eel. and tuna add flavor to the creamycrunchy interplay of sauce and vegetables. Rolls, both plain and elaborate, abound here. While some can be heavy on the rice and light on the fish, others are triumphs. The Toshi Tempura Spe-cial Roll takes battered whitefish and wraps it around the seaweed casing, which is then filled with just-cooked whitefish and a host of garnishes — an exotic-yet-homey fried-fish alternative. The Johnny Roll shows octopus at its most tender, but watch out for spotlight-hogging sweet cream cheese. The simpler sushi can vary — a brilliant, translucent slice of tuna offset by a blander, duller salmon. Japanese en-trées are also available. Inexpensive to moderate. — A.M. (4/02)

VILLAGE GARDEN RESTAURANT AND BAKERY 8384 La Mesa Boulevard, La Mesa, 619-462-9100. The Garden is part of what makes La Mesa Village great. Its vine-covered garden patio is wonderful on warm evenings. The decor inside is kind of grandma-ish, lots of green and white, with flowershaped lamps sprouting out of over-head fans and brass rails with momsy curtains between the booths. It's bright and cheery. And so are the prices. This is traditional fare: creamed chipped beef on toast, sandwiches, a dozen dif-ferent omelets, salads, and eight "signature" "big game" burgers. Maybe the best thing is their bread. Big, tender, and baked right there. Two must-haves: the Country Boy Sampler (a mix of Vir-ginia baked ham, chicken, and dumplings), and a take-home loaf of their apple-nut bread. One sniff and you're gone. Evenings, catch the early bird special. Great deal on the threecourse meal plus drink. Open breakfast through early dinner Thursday through Sunday, breakfast and lunch Monday to Wednesday. Inexpensive. - E.B. (5/02)

FAR EAST

BERNARD'S The Mall (way in back), 503 Palm Canyon Drive, Borrego Springs, 760-767-5666. Owner Bernard Hess must be from Alsace, on the French-German border — who else would offer both frog's legs in garlic sauce and a tasty, credible *choucroute* garni (sauerkraut and smoked meat casserole, including house-smoked pork chops)? At this local favorite, the space divided between a convival bar and a dining room with lunch-counter and booth seating, the menu includes German, French, and truck-stop U.S. classics - schnitzel side by side with chicken-fried steak. The waitresses know most patrons by name, and the patrons walk in already knowing what they're going to order — mainly the Alsatian specialties. Wine list runs to third-rate Californian, but there's an affordable Trimbach Riesling (and beer works with this food, too). Open daily, brunch to dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

KOUNTRY KITCHEN 826 Main Street, Ramona, 760-789-3200. Thank goodness the Kountry Kitchen's still around. They still open at 5 a.m. for the farmers and anyone else who's up then. They still make their own sausages, and grind their own burger meat, too. The Italian Sausage Breakfast is truly delicious: a fat pale-brown sausage with a rich, sharp, livery flavor, along with eggs and hash browns. Up there, too, is the Cowpoke Country Special, a buttermilk short stack with eggs and sausages or bacon. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

PAIPA'S OASIS Sycuan Casino, 5469 Casino Way, Dehesa, 619-445-6002. Forget gambling — gambol through the slots till you pass under two huge elephant tusks. The "Joe and the Volcano"-style place with a fountain tower gurgling in the center is Paipa's. Pay the woman. Now decide: a lot of a little, or a little of a lot. The huge salad bar is surrounded by a groaning U-shaped table laden with everything from peel

THE ABBEY CAFE 127 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-692-0311. Based on the chi-chi West Hollywood original. Look for the wooden cross tied to the giant cactus. By all means go during the day and sit out on the patio. But the must-visit time is after sunset, when they light the patio wall with thousands of candles (okay, 250 of them). Inside the 1910 house you eat in dark-wood rooms with (working) fireplace, church pews, metal chalices, black iron sconces, and stone cherubim. Pick from the all-day breakfasts (try the chicken breast, eggs, and fruit dish) or sandwiches if you're feeling cheap — or the Ahi Tuna New Orleans style (half a pound of fish) if you're more loaded. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (12/01)

BERTRAND AT MISTER A'S 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel Street), 12th floor, Banker's Hill, 619-239-1377. Bertrand Hug's airy, open renovation of this formerly "ancient regime" eatery offers a fabled panoramic city view with a casual-chic, highly romantic ambience. Chef Fabrice Poigin's modern French cuisine is a fine fit for the setting, including bistro classics and fresh inventions, emphasizing top-grade seasonal ingredients. A huge, intelligent wine list covers a full range of prices, ages and origins, including "ripe" firstgrowth Bordeaux. Smoking and fairweather dining on wraparound terrace/observation deck. Note: parking entrance on Fourth Avenue; wheelchair access via ramp to left of reception desk. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Expensive, but not bank-breaking. — N.W. (12/01)

CAFE W 3680 Sixth Avenue (south of Pennsylvania Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-291-0200. Chef-owner Chris Walsh combines world-ranging ingredients into eclectic, fusion-y "tapas" to mix, match, and share around the table in a lively, casual ambience. Three plates per person make a reasonably filling meal, particularly if you include some starches (e.g., pizza, polenta). Unfortunately, though, the number of menu choices has grown to a length beyond what the kitchen can execute with any consistency. Numerous vegetarian choices. Can be very noisy. Dinner Wednesday through Sunday. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (4/02)

CHEZ ODETTE 3614 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-299-1000. The nearest thing to a drop-in French bistro in town, even if Odette (yes, she's real) comes from Belgium. Her place is small, slick, and smells of fresh French bread. She and her husband are usually slaving away in the kitchen preparing for the constant banquets they seem to cater. She has cooked for Julie Andrews, Governor Jerry Brown, and Linda Ronstadt. For you, she'll cook great breakfast omelets (the *Provençal*, with peppers, mushrooms, tomatoes, and onions, or the smoked salmon are two good ones) They come with sautéed potatoes with the perfect tang of garlic. Lunchtime, the salade niçoise (with tuna, anchovies, olives, and potatoes on lettuce) is the real thing, and so is the quiche Lorraine. But be like the French: have your main meal in the middle of the day. Weekdays, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

EL FANDANGO 2734 Calhoun Street (next to Bazaar Del Mundo in the Plaza), Old Town Historic Park, 619-298-2860. This indoor-outdoor café sits right on the tourist-packed plaza. But come early, like 8 a.m., and you'll be practically alone. You're suddenly in a Mexican town, say 1840. Order up a chorizo (Mexican pork sausage) scrambled with eggs and rice and refried beans, or scrambled eggs mixed with *nopalitos* — cactus pads and chile verde and frijoles, and maybe add breakfast champagne. Soon you'll be conjuring up all the fandangos dances — that happened here. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. —

E.B. (12/01) EXTRAORDINARY DESSERTS 2929 Fifth Avenue, uptown, 619-294-7001. The desserts here do live up to the name, whether you gobble them on the spot on the patio of this charming café or buy them to take home. Owner Karen Krasne's pastries are created with strict French techniques with flavors inspired by the global reach of her trav-els, from the rice fields of Bali to the souks of Morocco. The white cakes are true food for angels — ethereal and not excessively sweet, vibrant with flavors of fresh ripe fruits — and some of the chocolate cakes (e.g., the "Caribe") follow suit, while others are rich and dense. Not your piece of cake? There are also tarts, cookies, chocolates, ice cream dishes, puddings, breakfast pas-tries, and fine teas and coffees, along with Krasne's own lines of honeys, jams, chutneys, syrups, and popcorn — plus a truly lovely assortment of international craft objects. Open for week day breakfast, weekend brunch until

late, closing at 11 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and at midnight on weekends. — N.W. (5/02)

THE GATHERING 902 Washington Street (at Goldfinch Street), Mission Hills, 619-260-0400. Be prepared for surprises: the owner-bartender is a professional magician who occasionally enjoys entertaining his diners and hosts shows with aspiring amateurs during Happy Hours Thursday through Sunday. This neighborhood favorite is comfortable with a *Cheers* atmosphere at the bar. Live jazz on Friday nights. Open daily, three meals, including Sunday brunch. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/00)

HOB NOB HILL 2271 First Avenue (at Juniper Street), Banker's Hill, 619-239-8176. It opened in 1944 as a 14-stool lunch counter, but it's been under new management since the turn of the century. Now, you sweep in under the maroon canopy to shiny red booth seats, deep blue carpet, blond wood, paintings, and a half-wall of wine. You're thinking "business class," but don't be fooled. We're talking coffee-shop prices, especially with the all-day breakfasts and sandwiches, not to mention the burgers with a salad tossed in. It's across the street from a retirement condo complex and at dinner, says the owner, "We cater to seniors." While there are à la carte choices, affordable three-course prix fixe dinners (with a regular entrée for each day of the week, Mom-style) are the order of the day — e.g., tasty barbecued pork on Saturdays, roast lamb or turkey Sundays. Open daily. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *E.B. (10/01)*

MIXX RESTAURANT 3671 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-299-6499. A meal here resembles an informal dinner party at the home of a good, well-traveled cook. Fitly, the dining room resembles a bohemian living room on steroids, with moody decor, rump-sprung Naugahyde banquettes, and witty paintings on the walls. The menu is an international hodgepodge of whatever chefowner Deborah Helm and/or chef de cuisine Zhee Zhee Aguirre fancies cooking: touristic Fisherman's Wharf crab-and-artichoke fondu in hollowed sourdough may cohabit with haute-Mex cremini mushroom quesadillas, "Indonesian" battered shrimp, or duck ragout with pasta sheets. Desserts (by Danielle Helm) carry through the "loving hands at home" theme — the most popular is a gooey peanut butter pie. A mainly California wine list is easy on both palate and wallet, with ample selections by the glass. Moderate. — NW. (9/00)

PARALLEL 33 741 Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-260-0033. Southern China, Pakistan, Algeria, Morocco, et cetera — are all on the 33rd parallel. This ethno-blend restaurant in Mission Hills is a hit for shrewd, thoughtful creativity. It's not just "fusion food." Try the suberb mango and ahi appetizer. Entrées like grilled salmon atop lobster tabbouleh or sea bass sauced with sake lees show that chef Amiko Gubbins, of Café Japengo fame, knows what she's doing. Dinner Monday through Saturday. Moderate to expensive. — *M.N. (10/99)*

SHAKESPEARE PUB & GRILLE 3701 India Street, uptown, 619-299-0230. Probably the most convincing English pub in town. The Bard's brew-house boasts bare-board floors, diamond lead-glass windows, and authentic Brits sitting around the bar quaffing ale from their own pewter mugs. Pub grub is bluff and plain-spoken. Shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, ploughman's plate (the pickled onions and cheese, Scotch egg, and Branston pickle make it the real thing) — all are great with a pint of rich English beer, say a Boddington's Pub Ale. Sunday's roast beef dinner is worth dragging yourself out of bed for, too. The pub includes a shop that sells British goods. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/01)

TRATTORIA POSITANO 142 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-294-6995. This younger sister to its namesake restaurant in Cardiff-by-the Sea is sure to be one of your favorite restaurants, not only for hearty but refined Italian food, but also for the warm atmosphere. Try sea bass, salmon, or any of the pasta dishes. A treat. Lunch and dinner daily. Upper moderate. — *E.W. (5/99)*



BAYOU BAR AND GRILL 329 Market Street (at Third Avenue), Gaslamp, 619-696-8747. Bayou has the most expansive (and expensive) Louisianastyle menu in the Gaslamp. Their best dishes are terrific — for instance, their red beans and rice (the washday treat) is the area's sole authentic version, meaty and with a rich, deep heat. Eggplant dishes shine, too, as do seafood pastas and a huge pork chop with dressing. Alas, though, too many dishes are faux-Paul Prudhomme, with incoherent spicing and, at times, too much cayenne added too late in the cooking to cozy up to other flavors. Desserts are frankly, fabulously revisionist, including pecan pie and bread pudding half as heavy and twice and good as their Creole models. Reservations advisable. Moderate to expensive. — *N.W. BROADWAY PIZZA 1008 Broadway (at 10th Street), downtown, 619-232-6264. This restaurant, near the downtown Senior Center and City College, offers good, no-nonsense Italian-American food. And they're not skimpy: from a pizza slice to barbecue beef sandwiches, portions are generous and filling. The sausage link sub (Louisiana-style hot sausage link sub (Louisiana-style hot sausage link, marinara sauce, and melted cheese) is great grub, but if you like a full dinner, try the whole slab of beef ribs, with veggies, garlic bread and salad. But the main thing is while the rest of downtown snores, they're still open, from 10 a.m.. to to 3 a.m., seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (8/01)

DOBSON'S 956 Broadway Circle, downtown, 619-231-6771. This reputable downtown restaurant offers class and comfort, geared for people who enjoy eating well. The food is good, often very good, as with chicken liver mousse påté, Mediterranean blue mussels, culotte steak, and, when available, the crude but virtuous soft-shell crab. Their sweets, such as brownies and bananas Foster strudel, are hefty, louche, and cheap. Bring a date to the upstairs dining room. Dobson's is suave, its confidence infectious. Moderate to expensive. — M.N. (10/98)

FEEDING THE HOMELESS Parking lot at 13th and Broadway, downtown. (Founders, St. Stephens Church of God in Christ, 5825 Imperial Avenue, 619-262-2671.) You may have to swallow your pride, but the food that St. Stephens and other churches hand out — which members cook in their own homes and pay for from their own pockets — is easy to swallow. Companionship's good too. Usually 200 or more people arrive weeknights, especially towards the end of the month, so lines are long, but street-side sermons keep you thinking, spontaneous outbursts of song may even get you clapping your hands, and the food is usually great. Chicken, stuffing, veggies, bagels, macaroni, fruit salad, cookies, bread, no questions asked. Weekdays 7 p.m.; weekends 3 p.m. Location may be shifting. Check with St. Stephens. Free. — E.B. (10/02)

GEN LAI SEN HAKKA SEAFOOD RESTAURANT 1065 12th Avenue (at C Street), downtown, 619-239-5478 or 619-239-5479. Across the street from City College, you'll encounter a split personality. The good twin provides superb Hakka dishes, a style developed a nomadic people originally from northwest China, now residents of mainly the south China coast. The bad twin dishes out gluey cornstarch-ridden stir-fries for starving students. But it's easy to tell which twin is which: The 'chef recommend sizzle plates," the hot pots that taste like home cooking (best ordered by four or more), the grease less fried rice, the noodles (especially "house special rice noodles"), and the whole steamed fish-of-the-day are palpable hits. And if you really want to know what the fuss about Hakka is all about, try the sizzle plate stuffed tofu these deep-fried crisp rectangles with a pork meatball inserted in each tender center resemble meat-flavored roasted marshmallows, and may just change your mind about bean curd. Open brunch through dinner daily. Pleasant service, very casual, mainly inexpen-sive. — N.W. (10/01)

LA CASITA 1247 C Street (at 13th Street), downtown, 619-531-0044. Don't be fooled by the li'l old blue-andwhite clapboard house at the bottom of City College's hill. Princes and politicians come to this full-service restaurant to hammer out deals, mix with the Latino (or Anglo) community, and eat some of the best chorizo con huevos (spicy pork sausage with eggs) in town. Fair-weather eaters flock to the spacious garden patio to chow down among the songbirds. In the cozy Mexican-style interior, the pictures on the walls tell you who-all comes here for the good tacos and enchiladas or the delicious pork burritos. Most delicious of all is watching Anglo City-Hallers trying valiantly to learn to love the house-made *menudo* (tripe soup). De-livery anywhere downtown. Open weekdays, breakfast through early dinner; Saturday breakfast and lunch. – E.B. (11/00)

LILO'S NEW AMERICAN CUISINE 1125 Sixth Avenue, downtown, 619-231-1969. Swank little Art Deco retro-café with a menu that's homey in a sexy way. Something about the dark varnished wood, cream walls, sconces, mirrors, giant French posters and a mezzanine gallery makes you feel ritzy. The menu tries hard to be interesting. How about gingerbread pancakes (with molasses and candied ginger) or pear and walnut salad with bleu cheese and sherry walnut dressing? Or chomp into the Belport chicken with sautéed onions, peppers, cheese, and mustard on a bun, or salmon fillet with caperanchovy butter, rice pilaf and a French baguette. Lunchtimes are speedy secretaries and their bosses; evenings, it's theater-goers. Breakfast and lunch weekdays; dinner Thursday through Saturday only. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (6/02)

NAPA VALLEY GRILLE 502 Horton Plaza, Gaslamp, 619-238-5440. This restaurant at the top of Horton Plaza is staffed by professionals and the food is very, very good, including the excellent calamari plate, and the moist, rotisserie-roasted chicken or pork. Their monkfish is a deeply satisfying Southern delight. Try the airy, sweet goat cheese cheesecake for dessert. There is an elegant homeyness to Napa Valley Grille, a comforting, satisfying dining experience. Moderate to expensive. — *M.N. (3/00)*

OSTERIA PANEVINO 722 Fifth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-595-7959. At this Tuscany-style Italian restaurant, the appetizers and pastas are as close to heaven as you can get, particularly the spinach ravioli and potato gnocchi in a four-cheese sauce. The stuffed focaccias are simply incredible, and the pizzas are well-nigh perfect. The exposed brick walls enhance the European feeling. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive, wines rather high. — *E.W. (4/00)*

SAFFRON NOODLES AND SATE 3737 India Street, Little Italy, 619-574-7737. Noted cookbook author Su-Mei Yu prepares casual Thai food — noodle dishes, soups, *saté* (grilled chicken, beef, pork) — to eat in or take out. There's gorgeous artwork to look at as you wait or chew. Open seven days, continuous service lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

SIXTH AVENUE BISTRO 1165 Sixth Avenue (at B Street), downtown, 619-239-4194. This charming, airy café offers some very credible New Orleansstyle cooking at affordable prices. Among the sandwiches are an outstanding oyster po' boy (with big juicy oysters and good light batter) and a fine, fully-packed approximation of a *muffaletta*, albeit with a kaiser roll standing in for Central Grocery's big, round Italian bread. The mix-it-yourself jambalaya is tasty, too, even if kiel-

STAR OF THE SEA 1360 North Harbor Drive (at Ash Street), downtown, 619-232-7408. This is not your father's Star of the Sea. In a chic setting with a romantic view, the seafood is fresh off the boat, and so are chef Brian Johnson's superb flavor combinations. Menus change seasonally, but one constant is an always-ravishing chef's tasting menu and its optional matching wine flight. A la carte dishes are equally alluring, and wines are interesting, mainly affordable, and poured generously into good, large goblets that show off their noses. Service is very considerate. Is this perfection? Quite possibly so. Somewhat dressy: reservations urged. Dinner nightly. Expensive to very expensive. — *N.W. (2/01)*

STRIP CLUB 340 Fifth Avenue (at J Street), Gaslamp, 619-231-3140. This grill-your-own steak joint is a homage to Golden Hill's Turf Supper Club but if Turf is a low-budget indie cult film, Strip Club is the Gaslamp's big. brassy, high-budget Hollywood remake (even though prices, like those of movie tickets, are roughly the same). It's loud and handsome, and if the USDA Choice steaks (available in numerous cuts) are not quite as flavorful as Turf's, they're still good enough for the price — and you can take them up a notch with numerous spice blends and sauces on hand at each gas grill. Other choices include burgers, chicken breast, ahi tuna steak, and meat or seafood kabobs (the shrimp is particularly good, with peppers, onions, and meaty hunks of Portobello mushroom). Entrées come with salad and puffy, cookit-yourself garlic bread, resembling hamburger buns with gigantiasis. Six veg and starch side dishes (including two types of gluey mashed potatoes) are available at extra cost; desserts are commercial ice cream novelties. Ca-sual, no reservations, street-patio dining available. Over 21 only, no minors even with adult accompaniment. Dinners Tuesday through Sunday nights, open late on weekends. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (11/02)

VIDA CART Corner of Fifth Avenue and Island Avenue, downtown. (No phone.) This is the kind of street scene vou would find in New York or San Francisco. Daniela, an artist from Bul-garia, started this evening-to-late-night food cart right under the historic Chi-nese Callan hotel. The idea was: extra cash between paintings. It has evolved into a late-night meeting spot for artists, students, chefs, and new downtowners looking for street-life. Friends and strangers sit around until 2 or 3 in the morning arguing about art, politics, and life in a town that's not used to staying up. Her staples are coffee, sodas, jumbo hot dogs, hot links, corn dogs, pretzels, and nachos. But her seven-inch pizza is as good as a meal, and the clincher is she has a fenced-off seating area where you can talk and watch the scene. And at Fifth and Island there's always a scene. Open Wednes-day to Sunday 6 p.m. until 3 a.m. or so. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

BAY BEACH CAFE Ferry Landing Marketplace, 1201 First Street, Coron-

ado, 619- 435-4900. The dinner menu here has California's typical dumbed down world-appetizer array, plus sal-ads, pastas, grilled meats, a few sautée items and children's plates. The restaurant is very family-friendly (full o' kids, actually), with a menu that appeals to the young in mouth: The chef seems to have a sweet tooth, since almost every dish involves honey or sugar - from the table butter that's intriguingly flavored with a honey-basil mixture to the "teriyaki" ribs in a glutinous Karo-like sauce. Your server will tell you about the day's fresh-fish selections, which are more attuned to adult palates with fresh, fine-quality seafood done sim-ply and well. Ultra-noisy inside when crowded; reserve for the lovely terrace with a view of the beach. Open daily lunch and dinner, with weekend break fast. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

ISLAND PASTA 1202 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-4545. This unassuming, spill-out-on-the-street restaurant has somehow got it right. Simple tables on the sidewalk, daily made-onthe-premises semolina pasta, most dishes costing in the single digits. A simple fettuccine Alfredo is a pleasure al fresco with a glass of wine, sparkling against the fresh flowers on the table, watching Coronado's world go by. The spaghetti pesto sauce is rich, too, with basil, pine nuts, and cheese, but all the standard Italian pasta and pizza dishes are reliable. One good — and vegetarian — special to ask for is the *verdure* pasta, a combo of artichoke hearts, spinach, capers, mushrooms, onions and olives over spaghettini. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

L'ESCALE Coronado Marriott Island Resort, 2000 Second Street, Coronado, 619-435-3000. Probably the pink flamingos and bay views bring you here first. But L'Escale ("Port of Call" in French) delivers to the taste buds too "Northern Mediterranean cuisine with California flair," read lots of pasta fish, salads, sandwiches. Try the grilled salmon *niçoise* salad with its richly sauced fish, crunchy green beans, red potatoes, strong olives, and rosemaryflavored bun. Entrées like grilled chicken and mushrooms in parmesan cream with penne pasta are safe enough. Or bone-in filet mignon with black pepper zinfandel sauce. But for sheer architecture, check out the tuna salad sandwich wrapped in lavosh: three vertical Armenian bread tubes, angle-sliced to reveal interiors of tuna and greenery. Eat on the pool and bay-surrounded patio if you can. Breakfast, lunch, dinner. Moderate to expensive. - E.B. (2/03)

RHINOCEROS 1166 Orange Avenue (at Loma Avenue), Coronado, 619-435-2121. This bright, hectic bistro next door to the Lamb's Players Theatre draws pre-theatre crowds as well as locals — and that may be a problem, since the rushed pace of service doesn't abate even after the playgoers have departed. Perhaps that's why there are few appetizer choices (as though to discourage diners from spending extra time at the table). You may even be charged a "split plate" fee for sharing a first course despite ordering individual entrées. Meat and fish choices are simply prepared with ingredients of ordi-nary quality and generic veggie accompaniments. Why, then, is Rhino so popular? Pasta (and nothing but pasta) is the answer — that's where the kitchen shines. Very noisy when crowded; street tables are slightly quieter despite heavy traffic. Reservations advised for weekends, pre-show din

SOUTH BAY REGIONAL CENTER CAFETERIA 500 Third Avenue (at C Street), Chula Vista, 619-691-4599. Hey, this is a courthouse. You expect the cafeteria in its basement to be brown and anonymous. You know you'll be munching with worried groups of litigants and moms with custody-dispute kids. But here, it's all worth it. This cafeteria is one of bestkept county secrets. For years, concession-holder Ben Riddell has kept his prices stable and his portions big. Lunches like roast pork or meat loaf or roast turkey or chicken pot pie or lemon chicken are the comfort food that folks coming here need. Breakfast and lunch only, Monday to Friday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

SPIRO'S GYROS Ferry Landing, 1201 First Street #4, Coronado, 619-435-1225. The food, the music, the view — are we outside Athens? Is this the Aegean? This inside-outside Greek café is located at the water's edge, and the heated patio has a spectacular view of San Diego, the bay, and the boat traffic. At sunset, sipping their excellent Greek wine (cheaper than their California), watch the sun set the city ablaze in gold. The prices keep Spiro's popular with the locals as well as tourists. Try the moussaka (eggplant casserole) or the souvlakia chicken, marinated in *tzatziki* sauce, served with tomatoes, onions, and pita bread. Open seven days until 8 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (11/00)*

TANGO GRILLE ARGENTINE STEAK HOUSE 635 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-0384. Play gaucho and enjoy the most authentic Argentine parrillada (mixed grill) in town at this charming, warmly decorated bistro about two minutes from the Chula Vista Shopping Center. Fine, smoky wood-grilled Colorado beef appears in several unusual cuts (including succulent steak-cut short-ribs). You can choose from two different mixed grills (sized for one or two), the first with conventional meats, the other - the more adventurous — includes organ meats and blood sausage. For starters, there are brilliantly seasoned mini-em panadas of amazing lightness, as well as several interesting salads. Those not in a grilled-meat mood can opt for nu-merous pastas (including a big, meaty lasagna) or the ubiquitous milanesa (breaded beef or chicken patties) of the pampas. Portions are more than generous, and so are the flavors. Low moderate. -N.W. (4/02)

TIN FISH Imperial Beach Pier, 910 Seacoast Drive, Imperial Beach, 619-628-8414. At a table by this fish shack at the far end of the pier, you can watch people and pigeons (and people feeding pigeons) as you dig into huge portions of simple seafood, appetized by the sea air. The bill of fare features fish - fried, grilled, chowdered, or wrapped into burritos, tacos, or sand-wiches. The big fried combos are about what you'd expect, but more piquant pleasures come in smaller packages. (Portions are generous, whatever you order.) The oyster shooters, for in-stance, boast a sauce made from fresh diced tomatoes topped with horseradish. The spicy fish tacos are re-ally spicy, while the fried onion rings are of surpassing delicacy. Best of all, the crab cakes are huge and seriously crabby, with plenty of meat and very little filler. Live music on weekends, good vibes all the time. "Tin Fish Shut-tle" (50 cents) runs from parking lot to





the restaurant. Open daily, breakfast (to 10:30 a.m.) through early dinner. A second branch at 170 Sixth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-8100, open daily lunch and early dinner, offers patio dining across from the Convention Center. Inexpensive to low moderate. -N.W. (7/01)

YE OLDE PLANK INN 24 Palm Avenue, Imperial Beach, 619-423-5976. The last true beach pub on the coast? It's a great mix: biker jackets, ZZ-Top beards, shaved heads, Navy vets, Air America jocks, surfers, and sometimes half of Hollywood seems to turn up. Food's pretty much always available, but the must-eat is their unbelievable weekend brunch. You get a 6- or 8-ounce steak (your choice, or substitute six sausages or ham or a pork loin), plus a one- to *ten-*egg scramble (or any style), home fries, *and* a pick-me-up drink (like a Bloody Mary, Screwdriver, Salty Dog, Bud, or Coke) from the bar, all at a standard coffee shop breakfast price. No wonder the place has stayed open since 1886. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (10/01)*

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number.

CAFE FRANCAIS LA BELLE CLAUDE Calle Galeana, #8186-A (at 7th Street, two steps off Revolución), Tijuana, 685-3415. Maybe it's no surprise: the most French-like *patisserie* of all is in Tijuana. La Belle Claude, named after the owner's daughter, looks far too expensive, but it's not. Inside it's a light and airy place, full of beautifully varnished wood, almost like a ship's sa loon, with little Eiffel towers painted here and there, Victorian ceiling fans and lamps, and a counter of display cases stuffed with cookies, artily frosted cakes, cheeses, and sodas. The menu is authentic too, offering such light dishes as *Le Croque Monsieur* (open-faced sandwich on honey bread with ham. grilled Swiss cheese, and béchamel sauce), the *Croque-Madame* (same as the "Monsieur" but with an egg), and salade niçoise (tuna, anchovies, tomatoes, cucumber, potatoes, egg, onions, and black olives). You can even order a *Provençal* omelet (zucchini, eggplant, tomatoes, and onions). Unusual bonus: the round cheeses, Cornish hen eggs, fresh vegetables, and honey on display all come from the owner's own farm, Rancho El Eden, beyond the Rodriquez dam. Open every day. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

EL CID Lopez Mateo 993 (just off Blancarte), Ensenada, Baja, 646-178-1809. This restaurant is at the heart of the tourist district, but the cooking and service are way above coach class. Look to the "Specialties" section of the huge menu for the most interesting selections. Crisp quail with rose petal sauce (famed from *Like Water for Chocolate*) proves outrageously delicious, and *chiles en nogada* (meat-stuffed poblano chiles with walnut-cream and pomegranate) gain refinement from greaseless ground sirloin. Fish dishes are fresh, rich, and tender, and you'll find nine different ways to enjoy a steak. If you can handle a tableside production number, crepes with *cajeta* (caramel sauce) makes a very grand finale. Fully bilingual staff; English menus available. Sidewalk patio dining available. Reserve for weekends during tourist peaks. Full bar, with excellent margaritas, Baja wines. Open daily, continuous service breakfast through dinner. *Moderate. — N.W. (4/03)*

EL FARO DE MAZATLAN 9542 Boulevard Sanchez Taboada, Plaza Financiera, Zona Río, Tijuana, 684-8882, 684-2236, or 684-8883. This fish and seafood restaurant offers a gorgeous dining room, an extensive menu with English translations, and fresh fish and seafood items which include abalone, squid, crab, clams, shrimp, and lobster. The atmosphere and service are lovely, but the fish may be too dry. The style of cuisine will appeal to those who prefer simple preparations. The price of the main course includes an appetizer (fried fish plus ceviche), seafood soup, and Mexican rolls. Open daily, 10 a.m. to 11 p.m., same menu for lunch and dinner, continuous service. Moderate. — *E.W.* **LA LENA** 11191 Blvd. Agua Caliente, Tijuana, 686-2920. Don't miss the charming room, the open grill, and the tortilla maker who prepares fresh tortillas as the diners are seated. Dinners come with an appetizer and soup, and some of the entrées are extraordinary. Try the *puños* ("fist"). Roasted quail and chicken do well here. Open daily, lunch to late dinner. Take Revolución to the left-hand bend where it becomes Agua Caliente. Continue past the twin high-rise towers of the Grand Hotel. A large sign marks the restaurant (on the right side of the road). Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

MANZANILLA Riveroll 122 (off Lopez Mateo), Ensenada, Baja Mexico, 646-175-7073. At this art-filled, very "Euro" bistro, a pair of gifted, classi-cally trained chef-owners are pioneering "new Mexican cuisine," creating sophisticated combinations of superb local products and traditional Mexican flavors. Fresh-caught seafood, local-grown vegetables and mesquite smoke from the wood-burning grill are fea-tured players on the seasonal menus; a spectacular rib-eye steak, tender and intenselv beefv, is also a constant. Little wonder this has become the destination restaurant south of Tijuana. The menu is in Spanish, but owners Benito Molina and Solange Muris Evans speak fluent English, as do some waitstaff. (The only communication problem will be the exotic music blasting on the sound system.) Reserve for weekends especially during tourist seasons. Full bar featuring tequilas, Baja vintners. Wednesday through Saturday, late lunch through dinner, until 11 p.m. Moderate. — N.W. (1/03)

MR. FISH 6000 Blvd. Agua Caliente, Tijuana, 686-3603. It's fun to eat in this restaurant with its thatched roof and wide variety of fish and seafood. Don't overlook the whole fish, either steamed or fried, the filet in garlic butter, or, for those who'd like a smorgasbord, the "Combination Mr. Fish," which supplies fresh lobster, shrimp, squid, and a filet of fish. The half-dozen preparations of crêpes are wild — there's even a Mexican version of blintzes. Open Sunday through Wednesday, 11:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m.; Thursday through Saturday, 11:30 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. Follow Revolución until it bends to the left and becomes Agua Caliente. Continue past the twin highrise towers. Mr. Fish is on the righthand side of the road, just before the country club. Moderate. — *E.W.*

RICA TORTA Niños Heroes Avenue, No. 890, between 2nd and 3rd Streets (opposite Dorian's department store), Tijuana, 685-8579. This café may have the best tortas (call them Mexican-style hamburgers) in Tijuana. Six-inch rashers of marinated *carne asada*, slices of ham, squares of cheese, chopped salad, tomato slices, fresh-scooped avocado...it's a double-wide, double-high burger. The menu has 16 different kinds of *tortas*, from chorizo with eggs to beefsteak ranchero, all served in huge, three-ribbed, crisp-toasted Mexican bread buns. There's other stuff, but to a burger buff, one of these is quite enough. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/01)

MULTIPLE LOCATIONS

D'LISH PIZZA AND PASTA 2470 San Diego Avenue, Old Town, 619-296-6969. Here in Old Town, at least, D'Lish gets a lot of custom from people who are Mex'd out, foodwise. This growing chain has always prided itself on its Italian/California pastas, pizzas, and salads. Now Old Town (along with Poway) has gone carnivorous, adding marinated flank steak and a rib eye to the "bistro entrées." If you're ordering the flank, well-done is a no-no. That will toughen it. But a rare flank is, well, d'lish in its marination and especially its pesto-like *chimichurri* sauce. Also good: fire-roasted vegetables pizza, where the quick roasting makes for great-tasting, Technicolorbright broccoli, zucchini, eggplant, and bell peppers. And "Mediterranean chicken salad" works well, partly thanks to the tang of pepperoni chips. A big part of the appeal of the Old Town D'Lish branch is the charming patio it occupies, with gas lamps, hanging flowers, and a fountain. Oh, and if you're not all-Mex'd-out, they've added a *carne asada* burrito and other borderfood choices. The curse of separation appears destined to repeat itself in the next generation.

erhaps you've been asking your-self why they don't make more two-and-a-half-hour video documentaries about African-American rehabilitated crack addicts who recover their children from foster care after six years of sepa-

ration and who then lose them again after their daughters give birth out of wedlock to HIV-pos-

itive babies. Or perhaps not. Love and Diane, if not an answer to a praver, is at any rate an answer to the question. It is not a film for the faint of heart or the weak of resolve, although against the tallest of odds it manages to end on an upbeat. (Not a Happily Ever After; more of a Hold Your Breath.) A family-values nightmare - notwithstanding the T-shirts that read "I'm a Fool for Jesus" and "Jesus on My Side" — it concentrates on the guiltladen relationship of the early-forties single mother and recovering junkie, Diane Hazzard, and her second oldest daughter, Love, who has given birth to the HIV-positive bastard, Donyaeh, pronounced "don-YAY." (There are three other daughters, Tameka, Trenise a/k/a Tootie, and Morean, and a son, Willie, in addition to a departed son,

Charles, who killed himself in his mother's absence.) After a knockdown-drag-out between Love and one of her sisters, Child Protective Services intervene to remove the younger children and the baby from Diane's

public-housing apartment in Brooklyn. And ΕW because the welfare DUNCAN SHEPHERD system attaches dollar values to dependents.

the rent is immediately put in jeopardy. Our sitting-in with Diane at a job-training interview hardly fuels our optimism. (The admitted history of drug abuse and jail time, the ongoing therapy sessions that cut into her weekly schedule, the naive fantasies of dressing up in heels for office work - where are her assets as an employee?) The curse of separation now appears destined to repeat itself in the next generation. And Love's difficulty in simply keeping milk in the fridge does not speak highly of her motivation as a mother. The ensuing attempts, in some fashion, to reassemble the family through the legal labyrinth - Love's appointed attorney, Lauren Shapiro, is a pillar of sanity and stability, however harried - provide both a storyline and an education.




Between the raunchy comedies, the gang-banger dramas, and the occasional role-model showcase (and their shared hip-hop soundtracks), there seems to be little place for this sort of subject-matter in the commercial black cinema: a "negative" image unpunctuated with gags or gunshots (or hip-hop hits). guments and unguarded moments that rival those in the home videos of Capturing the Friedmans. Nevertheless, even with interviews (disguised as "interior monologues") to flesh out the present-tense vérité drama, there is often a sense of missing pieces and lost events. Love's clinical depression, for instance, by and large eludes the camera, and her employment as a stripper whizzes past us in a single line. And although her baby "reconverts" (if that's the word) to HIV-negative, her own status with the virus never becomes an issue. I could go on, but then again, in another sense, maybe I couldn't. Already the burdens in the film are so great that the uplift at the end feels like just the first notch in an automobile jack. On a bed of sand.

For all its soundings of doom, *Terminator 3: Rise of the Machines* inhabits a world very far away from Brooklyn, a world of success, money, material assets, and the arrogance and condescension that characteristically accompany them. And it has no real reason to exist except to accumulate more of the same. One of those sequels that's really more of a remake, T3 tells pretty much the same story as T2, a time-travelling robot (correction: "cybernetic organism") reprogrammed to serve as protector rather than terminator of humanity's future savior, and a more advanced, shape-shifting, "anti-Terminator Terminator" hot on their trail. That the good cyborg is a somewhat thicker-set version of

the one seen last (now that Arnold Schwarzenegger has moved into his mid-fifties), and the bad cyborg most often takes the shape of a petite curvaceous blonde (Kristanna Loken, a mannequin in motion), fits in perfectly with the rub-it-in-your-face jokiness of much of the film. Edward Furlong, even though the lull in the action corresponds exactly to the twelve years since the previous episode, was for some reason found to be unfit to resume the role of the savior (perhaps the star of Pecker lacks the requisite air of success), and was therefore replaced by the cuter and "hotter" Nick Stahl (In the Bedroom). Gone, too, is Linda Hamilton, laid to rest, or rather scattered to the winds, to make way for the crinkled-browed Claire Danes as the fated mate of our predestined savior: "You remind me of my mother," he sighs, after she takes a hand with a machine gun. The film comes as close as possible to the ideal of "nonstop action" without passing into total monotony. And while it is inherently not possible to top the chase scenes of the immediate predecessor without also attaining idiocy, the film does indeed top them. (Jonathan Mostow, of Breakdown and U-571, occupies the director's chair vacated by James Cameron.) The ending, however, restores a healthy measure of gravity, which in essence returns us to the ending of the 1984 original. Which never required a sequel in the first place.

Legally Blonde 2: Red, White, and

Blonde follows our pretty-in-pink Harvard Law grad to our nation's capital (or Capitol) as a legislative aide with a personal agenda: to outlaw animal testing in the cosmetics industry and simultaneously to free the mother of her pet Chihuahua, Bruiser, in time for her nuptials. (Just as Bruce Almighty trotted out a clip of Frank Capra's It's a Wonderful Life to let you know whence it was coming, this one trots out a clip of his Mr. Smith Goes to Washington.) Our heroine is just going to continue to be herself no matter what, even if our leading lady, Reese Witherspoon, is going to appear to be a little less herself and a little more Lauren Holly, a little more Barbie Doll, a little more Gidget, a little more Everyblonde. But after all, why change, when the seas keep parting in front of her? Her string of successes takes all the awe out of her perseverance, and all the acid out of the caricature. The iokes, in any event, are so strained as to sour the mood long before she ever steps foot in D.C., and long before director Charles Herman-Wurmfeld (who, according to his bio in the press book, "currently resides in Los Angeles with his domestic partner, Jason Bushman," a bit player in the film) can advance the political agenda of canine homosexuality.

And no one tries harder with less to show for it than Jim Carrey, who for the moment has stopped chasing the Oscar (*The Truman Show, Man* on the Moon, The Majestic) and has gone back to being Silly Putty. Director Tom Shadyac, who worked with the actor in Ace Ventura: Pet Detective and Liar Liar, has not altogether abandoned his own tendencies toward Patch Adams and Dragonfly. A clip from Capra's It's a Wonderful Life sets the co-ordinates, and warns the viewer to watch out for low-flying schmaltz. 

to trial, in which a Jewish upper-middleclass family man and teacher in Great Neck, Long Island, already caught red-handed in possession of child pornography (postmark Amsterdam), was brought up on charges, together with the youngest of his three college-age sons, of molesting grade-school boys in the extracurricular computer class in his basement. Both defendants, for different reasons, ultimately pled guilty, but outside the courtroom both maintained their innocence. Everyone will have his own opinion, and it is to the film's credit that everyone will be moved to express it. The same, though, might be said about any round-table discussion of the crime du jour on Larry King Live — the same, that is, except that Larry King Live is not a film. (Are we crediting the film or the crime?) Like King, Jarecki religiously refrains from imposing his own views, preferring to leave it up to the viewer to decide: you, the jury. As a piece of filmmaking, the patchwork of present-day interviews and archival clips and stills adds up to no more than a meatand-potatoes documentary technique. What makes the film remarkable - the gravy, as it were — is that the clips go well past the standard TV nightly news footage (of which there is plenty) and extend to a whole boatload of home videos and audio tapes recorded throughout the ordeal. These, while oftentimes painfully revealing, still do not tell us everything we want to know. And in the last analysis, the film focuses too little attention on the range of possibilities in between the "nothing happened" line of the defense and the virtual Black Sabbath envisioned by the prosecution. There is an awful lot of smoke for there to be not a flicker of flame somewhere in the thick of it. For Jarecki, the choices seem to come down to "nothing" or all. For someone else, the choices could include infinite increments in between. Or in a word, something. 2003. ★★ (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

Charlie's Angels: Full Throttle — What would probably like to be thought of as a big goof, or alternatively a big boner, must instead be regarded as a big botch. The bigger-headedness that results from the big hit of 2000 is not an attractive feature, and in truth none of the three Angels — Drew Barrymore, Cameron Diaz, Lucy Liu - is even flatteringly photographed. (The one thing that worked in the earlier go-round -Diaz dancing — amazingly works again.) 

quadruple murder at a hip-hop night spot, whenever they're not distracted by their respective sidelines: Ford a neophyte realestate broker and Hartnett a yoga instructor and would-be actor in rehearsal for the Stanley Kowalski part in a hole-in-the-wall production of *Streetcar*. The film mixes action and comedy in such proportions as to produce acmedy or coction or possibly accomtion or cactedy. Or in another word, twaddle. A special pat on the back (not for congratulations but sympathy) to the prop department that came up with the misspelled ribbon for a funeral wreath: "In Memorium." Hulk — Any concerns over the involvement of director Ang Lee in a Marvel Comics project turn out to be not unwarranted. These concerns get immediately stirred up in the opening credits when you see, and hear, that the musical score has been ceded to Danny Elfman, who seems to have a virtual monopoly on such things (Spider-Man, Batman, Darkman, etc.), a textbook example of thinking inside the proverbial box. And they are further stirred in the first stages of the plot: the square-one biographical approach habitually taken in any comic-book superhero's screen debut: it will be fifteen minutes, and three child actors, before we reach the adult "Bruce Banner." Granted, there's more than normal

justification for this traipsing through the hero's boyhood ("He's just so bottled up") and adolescence ("There's something inside you so special"), inasmuch as the slant is far more heavily psychological than the norm (way beyond the "revenge" motive of Batman, let's say). Nor does the psychological heaviness ease up after the hero, in a lab accident, absorbs a deadly dose of gamma radiation which brings out the Mr. Hyde in him: "The gamma just unleashed what was already there." What was already there, of course, was a blatant appeal to the underage audience of comic books: to their sense of powerlessness, their sense of specialness or differentness, their resultant feelings of rage, their fantasies of transforming that rage into power. Ang Lee's film, never deviating from an Oedipal orbit, is nothing if not self-conscious. The first appearance of the big green man, nearly an hour into the action, changes almost everything. It changes the film, for one thing, into a mix of live action and animation comparable to Roger Rabbit or Space Jam. To be sure, this is computer animation instead of hand-drawn, but CG imagery has always done better, for instance, with reptiles (Jurassic Park, Godzilla) than with flesh-and-blood figures, even if the flesh happens to be the color of a tree frog. This unjolly green giant never quite seems to occupy the same space, even the same realm, as everyone else. And once he begins to flit about the landscape like a flea, all that





psychological heaviness comes to look more and more pretentious, more and more incongruous. One thing that does not change, despite any change in our perception of it, is the overall heaviness. Far from a kinship with your average superhero, the Hulk establishes a bond with the tragic figures of such grade-Z science fiction of the Fifties as The Amazing Colossal Man and Attack of the 50-Foot Woman, all the way to their miraculously stretchable clothes. Where he parts company with them is in his inability to be at once a source of tragedy and a source of fun. The Italian Job — High-tech tale of betrayal and revenge, lighthearted to the point of self-contradictory and callous (Charlize Theron does, at least, haul off and sock the man who murdered her father: that sure felt good), mechanically directed by F. Gary Gray. As remakes go, it has the advantage of coming from an unremembered source, Peter Collinson's 1969 British heist thriller. By the same token, it has the disadvantage of coming from a source unremembered for good reason. Mark Wahlberg, the star, is perhaps at a little less disadvantage here than in the past year's remake of the well-remembered *Charade* (new title: *The Truth about* Charlie), insofar as he's a shade less pale a copy of Michael Caine than of Cary Grant. Laurel Canyon — A psychiatric intern

brings his upper-crusty East Coast fiancée (at work on her dissertation on the reproductive activities of the fruit fly) to stay in his mother's house in the Hollywood Hills. But his mother, a free-as-the-breeze record producer, hasn't yet vacated the premises as agreed, along with the British rock band whose much younger lead singer is her current lover. ("She's really weird," the son draws upon his analytical training. "Probably a developmental disorder.") Plot mechanics, character chemistry, and lighten-up philosophy - "It's okay to leave the Ivory Tower and live a little" - are easy to imagine as a mainstream comedy, after appropriate casting changes, budget augmentations, and four or five re-writes to reduce the intervals between laugh lines and heighten the volume of the laughs. In fact, if it were a foreign film instead of a mere "indie" (from High Art's Lisa Cholodenko), it would be ripe for a remake, possibly retailored for Meg Ryan and Jon Bon Jovi,

and directed by Garry or Penny Marshall. As it is, we can be thankful there was a part in it for the inimitable Frances McDormand. (Not only a part, but a nude scene - or maybe not exactly a nude scene, but a nude frame or two — a Meryl Streepian Academy Award-winner's dramatically justifiable nipple flash.) And Kate Beckinsale always has more to offer than just her good looks and flawless American accent. Meretriciousness nevertheless runs rampant. 

The viewer who did not scrounge up the video of Part One for a refresher, or who has not committed the Tolkien books to memory, might have some difficulty getting his bearings. More simply, the storytelling is terrible. (Yeah, sure, the technology is terrific.) Every now and then someone, usually Viggo Mortensen or Orlando Bloom, will give a decent impression of being a legendary hero in a timeless landscape, but the point and purpose remain vague generalities. And the subhead of Part Two notwithstanding, it will be futile to search for 9/11 prophecy beyond (once again) the vaguest generality: "So much death! What can men do against such reckless hate?" The Matrix Reloaded — Will Zion fall to the Sentinels? Is the Oracle to be believed? Can the Keymaker be found? And how many times will the Architect contrive to use the word "ergo" in a single scene? And, when faced with the Lady-or-Tiger dilemma of saving Carrie-Anne Moss or the entire human race, whom will Neo choose? And finally, can anybody make heads or tails of any of this? Like so many sequels, this one seems to assume that the viewer will have purchased the video or DVD of the previous installment and committed it to memory, thereby absolving the filmmakers (the Wachowski brothers, Andy and Larry) from the drudgery of plot exposition. And like so many planned trilogies (the first *Star Wars* cycle, the second *Star Wars* cycle, *The Lord* of the Rings, etc.), as opposed to an unplanned trilogy like *The Godfather*, this middle installment feels like merely marking time and taking up space. And like so many FX movies, it looks and sounds a little disingenuous in its championing of humans over machines: "But we control these machines," asserts Neo, whistling in the dark. "They don't control us." (The humans, supposing Neo to be one, are not just engulfed in CG imagery but are occasionally and obviously transformed into it themselves.) And like so many movies of any stripe these days, the opaque and/or flimsy and/or Swiss-cheesy narrative of this one is no more than a pretext for surface spectacle, primarily in this case the fashionmodelling of sunglasses-and-raincoat ensembles. More simply, this movie is pretty much like a lot of movies. And the final installment could not come along soon enough to protect the second from forgettability. A Mighty Wind — Christopher Guest and his repertory group turn their "mockumentary" style — a style of expedience at best — to a reunion of Sixties folkies for a live concert on public television. There's a peppy New Christy Minstrels-like nonet known as the Main Street Singers (led by the well-scrubbed faces of John Michael Higgins and the dimply Jane Lynch), a Limelighters-like trio called the Folksmen (Harry Shearer on bass, Michael McKean on guitar, Guest on banjo), and an intensely romantic but bitterly divorced Ian and Sylvia-like twosome (Eugene Levy, looking frighteningly like Alan Rickman, and Catherine O'Hara). There's a total absence of Lefty politics among them, an absence that can certainly be found, when you look for it, in the mainstream folk movement of the day, but an absence of a potentially rich vein of humor all the same. Guest is not about to change his nasty habit of poking fun at the weak and defenseless: an aging, marginal, over-the-hill metal band in Rob Reiner's *This Is Spinal Tap*, a small-town community theater in his own *Waiting for* Guffman, monomaniacal dog people in Best in Show. The gradual decline continues, a little less gradually, as the "mockumentary



premise goes well over the verge of mannerism and shtick. This present mutation seems as high concept, if not as high budget and high profile, as any Adam Sandler comedy, and likewise more of a "pitch" or a "package" than a finished and polished film. By the law of averages, albeit far below past averages, there are some funny moments (a snatch of a calypso number by the Folksmen in rehearsal, a scrap of rhyming lyric to do with a "smelly old blanket that some Navajo wove"), and Catherine O'Hara merits the best-in-show ribbon for staying always in character and never pushing too hard for a laugh. 28 Days Later — In the violent prologue, a ski-masked commando team of animal rights activists storms the Cambridge Primate Research Center to liberate the experimental chimps, heedless of the attendant's warnings ("You've no idea!") that the chimps have been "infected" with rage. Sure enough, the chimps do not exactly embrace their liberators. Twentyeight days later.... A stark-naked patient (Cillian Murphy) awakens from a coma to find himself in a completely deserted hospital and a depopulated nation but for roving bands of blood-lusting zombies and isolated pockets of hunkered-down humans. Forget the superficial likeness to *Night of the Living Dead* and its sequels. The tradition of English literature here invoked encompasses the futuristic survival tales of John Wyndham, John Christopher, and (more pretentiously, less eventfully) J.G. Ballard. The prevailing standards of gratuitous gross-out, however, tend to obliterate the tone of civility that gave those tales much of their inner tension and conviction. Director Danny Boyle (Shallow Grave, Trainspotting, etc.) seems all too eager to surrender himself to the New World Order. Still, the last-manon-earth images of a post-apocalyptic London (ankle-deep litter, overturned bus, an eerie absence of people alive or dead) are highly evocative, even if what they evoke is not so much a dread of the future as a nostalgia for the Golden Age of the genre And the narrative incidents are grippingly plausible, at least up until the messy — in both logic and choreography — climax. It's all done on the cheap, which these days doesn't mean black-and-white photography, a location on a ranch outside Oxnard, and a lead actor of the caliber of a Richard Carlson or a John Agar. It means digital video. It means blurriness. It means fuzziness. It means (not in a sense that enhances the end-of-the-world theme) ruination. But that

Winged Migration — PBS-y nature documentary, French-made, following avian flight routes and disabusing you, along the way, of all that free-as-a-bird baloney. Being

a bird looks like killingly hard work. And getting picked out of the sky by duck hunters is an occupational hazard observed with a stoical no-comment. With its strict focus on migration, the film inevitably turns monotonous: it can switch from one species of bird to another, but it cannot build or develop; it can only spread. And it's as low on solid information as it is high on visual beauty. (And on otherworldly marvels: the Bar-Headed Goose getting out of the way of a snowy avalanche; the Clark's Grebe

running on water; the Northern Gannet nosediving into the Arctic Ocean.) The nature documentary, as a genre, may prove to be the last bastion of top-grade cinematography, the final line of resistance to video, the one sanctuary where it still matters How Things Look. "No special effects," we're advised in a printed prologue, "were used in the filming of the birds." Which is remarkable in itself. But does it rule out any digital cutting-and-pasting to transplant the filmed birds from one

backdrop to another? An irreversible drawback to the magic of computers is that something we would like to view with awe and wonder, we are obliged to view instead with doubt and suspicion. · Motorist Catherine Donkers got a ticket in Portage County, Ohio, on May 8 for not having her baby strapped in, mainly because she was breastfeeding it while she drove. Rather than pay the \$100 fine, Donkers's husband, Brad Barnhill, demanded a trial with himself as the defendant; his First Christian Fellowship for Eternal Sovereignty teaches that the husband must take responsibility for all of his wife's public actions. (That religion's principal focus, according to founder Christopher Hansen, is keeping "God-given rights" free of "encroachment of the Beast," which is defined as the government.) Barnhill said that he will make a citizen's arrest of the prosecutor at his next court appearance.

- Increasingly, chickens are being kept as pets in suburban homes, according to an Associated Press writer in June (though reporting with scant evidence). A Bala Cynwyd, Pa., family has nine chickens, which are "aesthetically pleasing," said the owner, even "cool." A Cedar Hill, Mo., woman recalled the 38 chickens she has had over the years and said "the best part" was "knowing them as individuals." Another Bala Cynwyd woman said her chickens are faithful in the way they follow her around the yard and are "very sweet. They give back."

Life Imitates Art

- (1) Life Imitates the Three Stooges: Providence, R.I., high school teacher Michael Dame was charged with assault in June when, being taunted by a truant student who had stuck his head in Dame's classroom, Dame slammed the door, catching the student's head inside. (2) Life Imitates the Movie Carrie: Dorothy VerValen filed a lawsuit against the city of Sultan, Wash., for a broken ankle suffered when she stepped onto her father's gravesite at the town cemetery to clear away moss, and the plot caved in beneath her. In June, the judge ruled it wasn't the city's fault.

News That Sounds Like a Joke

- In June, the St. Paul Pioneer Press profiled counselors Lynn Baskfield and Ann Romberg, who use the technique of "equine-assisted coaching" to help clients like Mari Harris, who wants to boost her singing career. In a typical session at a Stillwater, Minn., farm, Harris would ride and walk a horse until struck with some dramatic insight on how to achieve show-business success. Said Romberg, "It's much less difficult to accept feedback from a horse than a human." Another client said that when his usually passive horse suddenly sped up in a frenzy, "It got me thinking I [had] let [my] business lead me," he said he realized, and thus started drawing a balance between work and family.

The Continuing Crisis

- Tacky People's Rights: Among the more effortless budget cuts this year proposed by California (which is facing a near-catastrophic financial crisis) was \$400,000 by ending the free stocking of trout in ten Los Angeles County lakes, but local fishermen went nuts and got the county board of supervisors to denounce the cut. ... When Boston mayor Thomas Menino ended a giveaway program of free golf privileges for 15 local ministers, several black minister-golfers were incensed. Rev. James Allen said, "I don't want to make it a racial thing, but it seemed like that's what it was.'

- New Frontiers in PC: Sal Santana II, 12, was suspended for three days from an El Paso, Texas, middle school for sexual harassment after sticking his tongue out at a girl who said she wouldn't be his girlfriend. ... The Leander, Texas, school board voted in June to prohibit students from "teasing." ... Britain's National Society for Epilepsy said in April it had received several inquiries from teachers in training who had been instructed to avoid the term "brainstorming" because it was offensive to epileptics (substitute: "thought shower"). The society said "brainstorming" was okay.

- Just Can't Stop Myself: Investigatory work by a scorned woman turned up more than 50 others who were victims of the same man, 29year veteran U.S. Army Col. Kassem Saleh (most recently stationed in Afghanistan). Saleh allegedly struck up e-mail romances with the women and wrote "the most intoxicating love letters" one woman had ever read while assuring her (while assuring others) that they would soon marry. The 5-foot-10 Saleh encountered at least one skeptical woman, though: Saleh had claimed to be 6-foot-5, but when a first-meeting date with the woman neared, he wrote that he had shrunk

about five inches due to repeated parachute jumps. Saleh issued a public apology to the women after the New York Times outed him.

 In 1998, Barbara Downey killed her seven-yearold daughter with two gunshots to the back of the head, and she was committed to a state mental hospital; in March 2003, doctors concluded that she is no longer mentally ill, and she was released. ... Johnnie Eugene Maxwell, 56, accused of killing his father in 2001, was freed in June after a judge in Hillsborough, N.C., concluded that a stroke had left Maxwell cognitively unable to defend himself at trial because he can only speak three words: yes, no, and a certain cuss word. Maxwell could not be sent to a mental hospital. either, because he is not currently insane or a threat to himself or others.

 Anthony Perks, an endocrinologist and professor of gynecology at the University of British Columbia, reporting in the July issue of Discover magazine, set out his theory of the symbolic meaning of Stonehenge: the paired, capped stones (one smooth, one rough) represent the female's smooth skin against the male's rough skin, and the smooth stones match the locations of the vulva's labia minora and labia majora. An altar stone is in the position of the clitoris, asserts Perks. "Stonehenge," he said, "could represent the opening by which the earth mother gave birth to the plants and animals on which ancient people so depended."

Recurring Themes

- America's most underrated highway-safety problem appears to be senior drivers who mistakenly step on the accelerator instead of the brake: Henry Clax, 78, Jersey City, N.J. (hit three lampposts and then 13 people coming out of a Jehovah's Witnesses assembly, April); Marcella Stahly, 63, Albuquerque (tore through the front wall of a fruit market, March); Ms. Nahid Nainzadeh, 64, New Fairfield, Conn. (plowed halfway into a bank, April); Leonard Borok, 81, Coral Springs, Fla. (crashed through the front window of a post office, May); Waunona Reed, 85, Crescent City, Ore. (struck 26 people leaving an Assembly of God church, January).

Least Competent Criminals

- A suspected burglar in Albany, Ore., escaped

in June after failing in his quest to break into a warehouse, but he left behind his bolt cutters, some burned clothing, and part of his scalp. Police said the man had attempted to cut through a 480-volt line and probably had "severe" burns. - The burglar who is captured because his tracks lead away from a crime scene in the mud or snow is a story category previously identified as No Longer Weird. However, in May, Albert Jackson Dowdy, 22, in Grants Pass, Ore., tried to smash a glass door with a paint can, but the can broke open. Dowdy eventually got into the home, said police (total take: a can of tuna fish and a box of oatmeal), but on his way out stepped in the spilled paint and created tracks to a nearby

motel, where police arrested him.

 The National Assessment of Educational Progress, released in June, revealed that Washington, D.C., students score the lowest in the country in reading, even though the system spends more money per pupil than 49 states do, and even though teacher salaries are among the highest in the nation. ... Washington D.C.'s Options Public Charter School replaced its principal, Clarence Edward Dixon, in May after learning that he is a felon with a long arrest record and had been reporting to work daily wearing an ankle monitor as a condition of probation for credit card fraud.

Do you think you have a God-given right to live in America's Finest City? Think again.

Why not write about looking for an apartment on Fridays? Even on Friday nights. I've written about doing laundry because, hey, life goes on, Friday or no Friday. Besides, apartment hunting is even more of a full-time job, and if you take time off for recreation just because it's Friday night, you will lose, baby. You are goin' down.

I offer this, in a way, as a public service, as I wish someone had done for me. Of course, if you are in a position to pay much over \$1000 a month, then this will probably not apply to you. You will not have to look as hard for a decent habitat. No, this is more for those of us hanging on to the edge of the American Dream with suction cups from an under-\$40,000-a-year tax bracket. Here's how it is in San Diego.

Do you think you have a Godgiven right to live in America's Finest City just because you so choose? Think again. You should get down on your knees every day of your life to thank the powers that be that you are allowed to breathe the same sunshine and feel the same air molecules against your skin as the moneyed and the moneyed retired. If you did not make your fortune in real estate in Southern California in the go-go '80s and can now afford to treat your liver spots one at a time and with separate dermatologists, whose fault is that? Didn't pick up on the dotcom future until it was too late? Just be grateful there is a section in the classified rentals for you. But, of course, that's where your nightmare begins.

Here's a compact glossary of terms you will find and what they really mean. From a Friday-morning paper: City Heights. First, you should know that City Heights is not so much a geographical designation as it is a signal to owners of guns, registered or unregistered, that here's where your investment pays off. If your guns are registered, you are in a fine position to visit with your new neighbors whose guns are not. Registered-firearm owners might be lonely, but you could always look up the lone registered Republican. You two could commiserate over the latest Guns and Ammo and a crack pipe in front of one of the area's many convenience stores featuring frequent sales on fine malt liquors. Less than a grand a month should not be a problem here.

heater and rendered too drugged to swim when the flood level in the living room rose past four feet.³

A friend of mine once turned down a perfectly miraculous deal for \$700 a month because the building's owner upstairs did not have a television, and my friend required access to Jeopardy! every evening. This in itself was not all that off-putting. But the owner was a centenarian, and my friend figured it would have been a matter of weeks, if not days, before he would have to hit the classifieds again.

Personally, I found the power of prayer to be especially useful in this endeavor. A homeowner with a converted garage and an angelic, celestial name answered my "Quiet Writer Seeks Residential Rental" sign in a coffee shop in a nice part of town. Other than prayer, however, I have only one other useful word for the less-than-wealthy renter in San Diego County. That word would be "Tijuana."


