- (2) They smell good.



son **Dominic "Bud" Alessio** did time in the same place two years later, after being convicted of providing "gratuities" to a prison administrator for going easy on his old man and uncle, who were allowed offsite motel visits with women, among other small favors, the Los Angeles Times reported. In 1988, Bud sought a pardon, enlisting local bigwigs like onetime San Diego police chief and Union-Tribune executive Bill Kolender and Catholic bishop Leo T. Maher on his behalf. Now Johnny, the former West Virginia coal miner's son, is among those honored in Little Italy's streetlight-banner lineup of famous Italian-Americans. Alessio's flag, adorning a pole at the corner of India and Cedar Streets and bearing his photo, is sponsored by NBC-owned KNSD-TV and the taxpayer-funded Centre City Development Corporation.

Wheeling and dealing Has uncertainty generated by the Cheetahs indictment of San Diego city councilman Ralph Inzunza thrown a wrench into the school district's plans to unload a large piece of property it owns on Commercial Street just east of downtown? Inzunza and his backers have been pushing hard for the district to spin off the real estate for development as condos, apartments, and various commercial uses. Earlier this year, the councilman showed up with a well-organized group of his backers at a board meeting to speak personally in favor of the move, departing loudly disappointed when the required super majority vote for selling off the land could not be mustered. One principal supporter of the proposal is boardmember Katherine Nakamura, wife of architect Kotaro Nakamura. Her political backers include Inzunza; rental properties in the Com-



mercial Street neighborhood belonging to his brother Nick, mayor of National City, bore pro-Nakamura signs during her 2002 campaign. After the board turned down the initial proposal, school district superintendent Alan

**Bersin** — another Inzunza Alan Bersin ally who has frequently met

with the Eighth District councilman, according to official calendars released by Inzunza in June ordered his staff to keep pushing the deal. Part of the Bersin strategy included establishing "Commercial Street Redevelopment 'Short List' and

'Ranking' Committees," according to a May e-mail from district property aide Louis Misko. The "community" advisory group members, ostensibly independent from district staff, were to recommend a development proposal from those submitted by competing interests, some including Inzunza's campaign backers. A July e-mail from Misko's boss, **Bob Keisling**, to Bersin honcho **Lou** Smith outlines how members of the so-called citizens committees are to be picked by Misko and signed off by Smith and the district's Facilities Management division. The public was not invited to apply. Of one proposed member, Connie Zuniga, Misko wrote: "She has an open mind and will be considerate of the District's needs and concerns." For public consumption, the appointments were to be fronted by school-board member Ron Ottinger. "Louis has outlined the background for each below and a recommendation that they be appointed by Ron Ottinger as the rep for this district," says Keisling's July e-mail. "I'd recommend that you approach Ron Ottinger and see if he is willing to nominate these people. If so, we will take it from there to see that it gets done. If not, then I'd recommend that we nominate them from Facilities [Management]." Contacted last week, Misko declined comment. At press time, the revised Commercial Street deal had yet to see the light of day.

Not too hot to handle To pick up a little extra cash, the San Diego Unified School District board has quietly approved installation of cellphone microwave-transmitting stations at various local schools, starting with Point Loma High. Parents worried about radiation danger will be comforted to know that "numerous studies have been done on the effects of electromagnetic fields in general and wireless facilities specifically, with no harmful effects reported," according to a report from district chief of staff Terry Smith ... City councilman Michael Zucchet, facing mounting legal ex-



# **Who Ran Zandria?**

n December 6, 1998, attorney B. Roland Frasier III, who resides in Rancho Santa Fe, was touting his book, Asset Protection for


Everyone: Secrets to Legally Safeguarding Your Hard-Earned Money, Home &

"I never really thought about the need for asset protection until I experienced the effects of not having it," sentimentalized Frasier, writing for Amazon.com. "I watched my father and many of his closest friends lose millions of dollars through lawsuits, bad timing, and the relentless pursuit of fees by attorneys." So, claimed Frasier, he launched an "exhaustive search" that led him to "tropical islands, famous tax havens, and all sorts of interesting characters." The result was his book, which is filled with advice on stashing one's loot in secrecy-shrouded offshore tax havens.

But the government is prying into Frasier's offshore adventures, just as it has looked into the dubious activities of his daddy, B. Roland Freasier Jr., also a San Diego County resident. (It is not clear why B. Roland Frasier III dropped the first efrom his last name, although Papa Freasier had a malodorous reputation in Virginia before falling in with a

foul-smelling crowd in San Diego.)

Early this month, the Securities and Exchange Commission charged that Frasier and another San Diegan, Richard May, orchestrated a fraudulent scheme through which they gained control of



Zandria, a once-hot San Diego Internet stock that soared above \$6, then collapsed to a tiny fraction of a penny before going bankrupt.

And who ran Zandria? Well, on the same day, the Securities and Exchange Commission also filed a suit for stock market fraud against the company's heads, including Brian Lee and Todd

DiRoberto, both of whom had been incarcerated for conspiracy to distribute narcotics. (DiRoberto had earlier failed with a sushi bar on Prospect in La Jolla.)

The securities commission charged that Frasier set up a dummy company named Shesado on the tax haven of Nevis, which with its sister St. Kitts is located in the Lesser Antilles in the eastern Caribbean. Nevis does not recognize monetary judgments by foreign nations — an ideal place for the scam that the securities commission outlined in its charges.

Using Shesado as his alter ego, Frasier set up other empty corporations in Nevis with names like INET Capital, Jamestown Capital, Internet Investments, and Manitoba Systems. Then he distributed shares of those straw companies to compatriots, including May, who used the shells to conceal their control over Zandria.

In a deal with DiRoberto, Frasier was to receive \$300,000 and seven million shares of free-trading stock in a Zandria predecessor company if he would find a shell company through which Zandria could go public. (Instead of going public in an initial public offering, companies that don't want

# **Wartime Flares**

odolfo Anguiano, member of the Playas de Tijuana environmental organization Grupo Gaviotas (seagulls), wears a pair of

latex gloves as he holds the gray metal cylinder, about a foot and a half long and three inches in diameter. It's one of eight that he and other Gaviotas have picked up on the first three miles of beach south of the border fence. "But some of the cylinders," says Anguiano, whose snowy white hair and mustache make him look like Mark Twain, "were a little bigger than this one, maybe two feet long. Some were still smoking when we got to them. And others, if you overturned them or moved them, would react and start to give off fumes. They started washing up about a year and a half

Standing inside the cluttered Grupo Gaviotas office, a block from the beach, Anguiano spins the cylinder in his hands so that the visitors from San Diego can read the labels. One of them, white with surprisingly unfaded red lettering, reads, "FLAMMABLE. DO NOT HANDLE. MAY CAUSE SE-RIOUS BURNS, IF FOUND NOTIFY POLICE OR MILI-TARY." At the other end of the cylinder, faded black lettering lays out a procedure for arming and launching the device. Both labels are in

English.

Anguiano reads enough English to know the cylinder contains phosphorous and knows enough chemistry to understand that it's dangerous. He carefully places it in a paper bag, which he stores out of doors. But he worries about the Playas beachgoers who don't read English. "Who knows how many more of these have washed up here?" he says. "I'm afraid that people might just pick it up, or handle it like a toy or a novelty, or even keep it as a souvenir, not knowing how dangerous it is."

Letters Anguiano has written to his congressman and even to President Fox about the mysterious containers washing up in Playas have gone unanswered. More responsive was the local office of the federal agency Attorneyship for the Protection of the Environment, known in Mexico by the acronym PROFEPA. The Mexican counterpart to the Environmental Protection Agency came and collected seven of the smoking cylinders from the Gaviotas, albeit eight hours after they were called. Anguiano kept the eighth cylinder for publicity purposes, though he admits, "I

don't really know what it is and where it came from."

"We see those things all the time," says Imperial Beach lifeguard Don Davis over the phone, pausing to direct a swimmer away from a riptide area over the station loud-

"They're phosphorous flares from Navy ships and they're really dangerous. You probably shouldn't handle them. At room temperature, they can go off and start smoking and get very hot."

When Davis or one of his colleagues finds a flare on Imperial Beach, they call the San Diego County Sheriff dispatch office, who in turn calls the Sheriff's bomb/arson team, which is run by Sergeant Conrad Grayson. Reached by phone, Grayson immediately confirmed that the cylinders are flares from the Navy. "The smaller size is the Mark 25, and the Mark 58 is the big one. We're very familiar with them; we pick up 80 to 100 of them a year, all over the beaches from San Onofre all the way to the border park. I have been doing it for 26 years. It is a routine procedure."

Asked for a more detailed description of the flares, Grayson reads from a training bulletin he wrote on how to handle them." 'The Mark 58 is a floating marine location marker which provides reference points on water during the day or night by producing white smoke and yellow flame for 40 to 60 minutes.... They are painted white or gray with black stenciling. They are made of steel coated with an alloy of tin and lead, and weigh approximately 12.8 pounds. Each flare contains...a pyrotechnic

composition of red phosphorous." The Mark 25 flare, according to Grayson's bulletin, also burns red phosphorous but, at 18.99 inches, is shorter than the 21.78-inch Mark 58 and weighs only four pounds. "I wrote the first training bulletin on handling these things in 1984," he recalls. "And because this is an ongoing thing, I updated the thing on May 2001, and I pass these out to all the lifeguard departments and all the fire departments in San Diego County."

The training bulletin calls for the reporting agency, usually lifeguards, to not handle the cylinder but to watch over it to keep beachgoers from touching it and then call the bomb/arson team. "We're usually there within 20 minutes," Grayson says. "What we do is we get wet sand and seal it off and then we duct tape the heck out of it so that it doesn't allow any air in and then we have special metal tubes that we get from the military that we place them in to transport them to our range in East County. They are stored there until someone comes from Navy Explosive Ordnance Disposal and takes them away. This is very

routine for us.

"The worst thing you can do," Grayson continues, "is handle one of these. Because what happens is a certain amount of phosphorous doesn't burn away. So this thing bobs around in the ocean, and the ocean water will then seal up the pores that would allow the smoke to come out. And it becomes encrusted and then it floats ashore. The lifeguards are usually the ones who find them, but periodically someone will come along and kick the thing, which may knock the crustaceans off it and then it starts burning and letting off smoke and getting really hot because air will cause phosphorous to burn."

Even more dangerous than that possibility, Grayson says, is the occasional beachcomber who "either can't read or is just stupid" and decides to take the flare home as a souvenir. "So they put it in the trunk of their car and they go bumping down the  $\stackrel{\circ}{\approx}$ highway and all of a sudden they smell smoke and their car is on fire. I teach all the CHP officers in this county and in Riverside to call me when they see the trunk of a

Predictably, Frasier found a shell owned by a "securities fraud recidivist," according to the commission. (He is a chap in Utah who earlier spent 14 months in prison for conspiracy, wire, and securities fraud.)

The deal was pulled off. The Zandria predecessor was merged into the shell, and the new company was renamed Zandria. Then, through a daisy chain of sham transactions in Nevis, centered around Shesado, Frasier and

his confreres got control of more than 90 percent of Zandria's free-trading stock.

When he agreed to the deal, DiRoberto did not know that Frasier controlled Shesado. "Roland Frasier took advantage of knuckleheads," says Earl Wong, who earlier sued Zandria and got a court judgment but has never been paid.

After they got control of Zandria's free-trading stock, Frasier and his buddies hired

inued from page 4 a bunch of telemarketers who peddled Zandria stock to unsuspecting investors, as Frasier and friends merrily unloaded their shares, according to the commission.

I asked the commission's case prosecutor if capital gains taxes were paid on that stock sold out of Nevis straw corporations. She refused to

The securities commission has reached a settlement with Frasier. He has been ordered to pay \$456,000 in penalties and has been barred from participating in pennystock offerings.

That's not the first payment he has made as a result of this caper. Earlier, San

Diego attorney Eric Benink filed a malpractice suit on behalf of Zandria against Frasier and the law firm he then headed, Gage Frasier & Teeple. Benink spelled out the Shesado fraud. The transfer of \$300,000 and seven million shares offshore did not benefit Zandria, according to the suit.

CITY LIGHTS

Benink says he provided his findings to the Securities and Exchange Commission. The settlement was confidential, he says. Wong believes Frasier paid \$250,000 to Zandria.

In November of last year, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Internal Revenue Service raided Gage Frasier & Teeple and carted off documents as part of a criminal investigation.

Shortly, Frasier resigned from the firm. It changed its name to Gage, Teeple. Now, it refuses comment.

It's fairly clear what the criminal investigation is about. And the main thrust is almost certainly not Zandria. I have interviewed several people who have talked with the government's criminal investigators. These sources say the feds are looking into whether Frasier helped embattled San Diego eye surgeon Glenn Kawesch evade taxes

State officials have been trying to get Kawesch barred from the practice of medicine. As those hearings were going forward, Kawesch pleaded guilty last May to evading \$4.2 million in federal taxes, greatly through offshore tax havens. The names of the attorneys who helped him set up sham contractual agreements in these havens have not been released.

Kawesch has been cooperating with the federal government. One of his capers, according to the San Diego U.S. attorney's office, went through Nevis. Assisted by an attorney and others, Kawesch drew up a fictitious marketing service agreement between his corporation, Southwest Eye Care, and an entity called Telco, which was supposed to provide marketing assistance to Southwest for a \$1 million fee. If the services were not provided, Telco would make a capital investment in Sequoia, Ltd., which was based — where else? — in Nevis.

It was all a ruse to permit Southwest to take a \$1 million tax deduction for marketing help that was never provided. In effect, Kawesch's income electronically drifted offshore to Nevis and then back to Kawesch, thus slipping past tax collectors' eyes and permitting the surgeon to evade taxes.

People who have been intimately involved in Frasier's activities tell me that federal investigators are eyeing him in the Telco/Sequoia phan-

itinued from page 10 tasma. Kawesch refuses to talk about the subject with me, referring me to his lawyer, Michael Lipman, who also won't discuss the matter.

Federal investigators are not

talking.

Frasier and Nevis go way back — back to his father, in fact. In May of 2000, a bank filed suit in Richmond, Virginia, against the law firm of the elder Freasier and his son. The suit charged that the pair had assisted a person who owed money to the bank to stash his loot in Nevis.

Court records from Virginia also reveal why the senior Freasier left Virginia. In an appellate decision, the court noted that in 1972, a

rich woman hired her physician, Alvin Jarrett, to oversee her personal and financial affairs. Jarrett hired Freasier as legal counsel. "Through systematic physical and emotional abuse during the ensuing 14 years, Jarrett and

Freasier induced [her] to relinquish to them total control of her day-to-day affairs," noted the court. "As a result of their fraudulent activities. Jarrett and Freasier were able to divert a substantial portion of [her] assets to themselves and their families" without her consent.

Freasier and son Frasier made their way to San Diego in the late 1980s. Freasier was both a lawyer and an executive for Melvin Lloyd Richards, a convicted stock swindler who dealt with offshore tax havens and has spent several stretches in prison. Frasier represented Richards, too, in at least one matter. According to the Securities and Exchange Commission, during his time at his former law firm, Frasier "purported to specialize in offshore asset protection."

And he wrote a book telling how to shelter assets offshore. Investigators reportedly read it with glee. Neither Frasier nor his attorney returned calls. Freasier could not be reached

car just catch on fire, which is unusual. There will usually be the remains of a flare canister in there."

Though picking up the flares from the county's beaches may be routine for the bomb/arson team, this year hasn't been routine in terms of the numbers they've retrieved. "We've picked up over 100 already, and it's only September." Grayson attributes the increase to the fact that "there's a war going on."

That increase may account for the flare canisters showing up in Playas, where, Anguiano says, they haven't been seen before. But Grayson says they have washed up on northern Baja beaches before. When that happens, Grayson explains, "Their federal EPA will call us, and we will go down to Otay and meet them at Customs. We take the flare from them and tape it up the way it is supposed to."

He adds, "They are just not trained in how to handle these things; they throw them in the back of their pickup truck."

Grayson says the Englishonly labeling might account for the poor handling in Mexico. "I can't tell the U.S. government what to do," he says, "but they should make these labels in Spanish too. Because these things end up down as far as Ensenada."

# STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP

We work at Ogden's Dry Cleaners. We spend most of our day cutting things out of the Reader and doing crossword puzzles. We have been very disturbed by this question for a while. We wanted to know if the elves had the answer. If wool clothing shrinks drastically when it gets wet, then why don't sheep shrink when it rains?

— Jessica and Caroline, at work

Hey, you two!!! Once the Ogdens read your letter, you'll have even more free time, so you can flip back to the "Jobs" section of the classifieds and see what else the Reader has to offer. And to help you start your new careers with clear heads, here's your answer. First of all, wool doesn't shrink, it "felts." Wool fibers are like human hairs and fish — covered with a layer of overlapping scales. On the hoof, the wool strands are oily, growing in neat rows, with all scales pointing in the same direction. This keeps the fibers separate and fluffy, even in a rainstorm. But then we come along and buzz-cut the animals; wash, comb, and card the wool; and then spin it into yarn. After all that aggravation, the wool fibers are stripped of lubrication and mixed up, some pointing one way, some pointing another. As the wool strands rub against one another, the upand down-pointing scales lock together. At the manufacturing stage, this helps make a strong wool fiber. But heat and water lift the scales on the wool strand, and agitation increases the interlocking. which is why you risk turning your new lamb's wool sweater into cardboard if you wash it in a machine. This is felting. The fiber doesn't get smaller or shorter; you don't magically lose a yard or two down the drain. It just tangles into a stiff mass. But don't despair. Genetics to the rescue. The Aussies are breeding sheep that naturally produce low-felting wool. Then you, me, the sheep, the Ogdens, we're all happy.

MA of Reader:

I just got a phone with caller I.D. About once a week I get a call from (999) 999-9999. That number never leaves a message, and once, when I picked it up, all I got was dead air. What's the

Oh, those wacky, fun-loving telemarketers. What will the tricksters come up with next? This nines thing is just the latest. Once upon a time, caller I.D. had some call-screening value. A telemarketer certainly isn't going to reveal his true phone number when he or his autodialer phones you up, so your I.D. box says "Unknown Caller" or some such euphemism. You, being no fool, don't answer, since that's why you got caller I.D. in the first place. If you're really on the telemarketer warpath, you might have installed the blocking feature that won't even ring your phone if the caller doesn't have an identifying phone number

So what's a poor telemarketer to do? Well, to the rescue come companies that sell and install phone networks for big office buildings. They work through what's called a PBX, a switching center for a company's individual phone extensions. Doggie Daddy should not let Bowser off leash; that's law number one on your side. (And a legal leash is no more than six feet long.) Dog-poo laws require the human in charge to curb the dog, clean up the mess immediately, then dispose of it in a "proper receptacle." But not necessarily the closest proper receptacle. Trespass laws might apply here if they tromp across your property. A well-placed note on the can lid might let the miscreants know you're irritated. But don't expect much. Nothing irritates dog owners more than listening to cat owners whine about being picked on. If you and your free-range kitties can't take it anymore, try the city's mediation service. It's better than throwing a volume or two of the municipal code at them.

# SportingBox By Patrick Daugherty

# Stop. Break. Box.

inishing with Tony Crebs, professional boxing referee... Crebs, 47, began refereeing amateur bouts for the California Border Association/USA Boxing ten years ago and eventually became their chief of officials. Since turning pro in 1999, Crebs has refereed over 100 professional bouts, his most recent work seen on Sunday's televised fight card from Pechanga Resort Casino in Temecula. The main event was a NABF Bantamweight Championship bout between current champion Ricardo Vargas and Roberto Bonilla (Vargas won on a split decision).

Crebs and I have been talking about the differences between pro and amateur boxing. Tony says, "In pro fights you can hold a guy. You can clinch.

"So, in the pros, it's legal to hold until the referee says, 'Break'?"

"Exactly," Crebs says. "Look at [Muhammad] Ali. He was the holdingest son-of-a-gun in the world."

Yeah, toward the end, which is what people remember. I ask, "What's the weirdest thing you've seen in a dressing room?" Oops, too quick a jump. "Let me rephrase. You've walked into 100 dressing rooms in order to instruct fighters on the rules. You must have seen a fair amount of oddball behavior?'

Crebs laughs, "A lot of kids wear the walkmans. They're dancing. They're standing on top of a folding metal chair gyrating along, singing along to the music."

'Have you ever walked into a party? Ten or twenty people dancing instead of one?"

"Oh yeah, but you have to be licensed to be in the dressing area. Usually, early on in the evening, girlfriends, moms and dads, aunts, uncles, mariachis, singers, the whole entourage is in the dressing room. But the state is real good about that, and pretty quick they're in there running everybody out.

The bar is closed. "What do you actually say to a fighter?"

You go into the dressing room and you ask, 'Are you so-and-so?' 'Yes, I am.' 'Do you speak English?' About half the time they don't. If they don't, you try and find somebody, like a fellow official, to interpret. And then you go through the rules. Takes a minute, but some referees go on and on like they're giving the Gettysburg

"The first thing I ask is if he's had amateur fights. In amateur boxing the universal language is English. A referee is only allowed to say three words, 'Stop. Break. Box.' So, if a kid is from Russia, and he tells me, 'Yes, I've fought, I've had 100 amateur fights.' I say, 'Stop. Break. Box.' And he nods, he knows.

'And if the kid answers 'No' when I ask if he's had any amateur experience, and I look down at my sheet and see it's his pro debut, then I know it's going to be a rough-and-tumble fight.

"Sometimes," Crebs says, "the guys are all hyped up and anxious. You can tell they're nervous. They're running around, they've forgotten their mouthpiece, they're not prepared. You gotta shout, 'Hey, hey, hey, focus here! Give me a minute of your time.' And you tell them, 'Don't hit behind the head, don't hit the kidneys, don't hit below the belt, and if you knock a guy down, don't hit him when he's down.' Those are the four big ones.

Easy to say, hard to do. "What are professional fighters making nowadays? I mean, kids who are just starting out."

Crebs says, "The going rate is \$200 per round when you're starting out. So, a four-round fighter will make \$600 to \$800. The more rounds you fight, the price starts going up. You get up to six-round, eight-round fights, and you're making \$1500, \$1800."

I am not tempted. "That's a hard dollar. How much do you make?"

"I have no idea. I never know. Some referees have got it figured. They'll ask, 'Is there television money?' That makes a bigger payday for everybody. The state has inspectors who will actually go to the ticket booth and ask, 'Okay, what's your gate?' And, you know what? There are a lot of referees who could tell you down to the penny what the gate is."

Last question. "What do you do when you're in the ring with fighters you've reffed before?"

'Two of the kids who [fought last Sunday] are kids I've known since they were 12, 13 years old. I've reffed Jorge Martinez in the amateurs and junior Olympics. I've reffed him as an older boy going through the Golden Gloves and the Olympic trials and the U. S. National Championships. He had an excellent amateur career, and now he's in the pros, and I've seen and worked a couple of his fights. So, I know him real

I just wouldn't be doing anybody any good."

"If a reporter approaches you in the parking lot and asks to speak with you, simply say, 'No comment.' In the Episcopal Church, if a reporter approaches you, saying 'no comment' is an okay thing to say.'

Last Sunday morning's 10:00 a.m. service at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church didn't end the way I thought it would. I stood a few feet from Reverend Joseph Acton when, just prior to the bene-

diction, he fixed me with his gaze, wiggled his eyebrows, and announced my presence. One hundred pairs of eyes focused on my red fat face. I chuckled in an unnatural way.

Eleven days earlier I'd addressed a sociology of religion class at SDSU. Professor Gordon Clanton had asked me to speak to his students about my job. For this class, Professor Clanton requires students to visit a place of worship unfamiliar to them and write a paper about their experience. Some of the students were apprehensive. I told them. "Don't worry. No religion advocates the mistreatment of visitors. No matter where you choose to go, people will be nice to you."

St. Timothy's 6300square-foot "worship center," as the church's website calls it, was consecrated in early September. Careful thought informed the nave's design. Three big win-

dows in the eastern wall frame views of chaparral. Like Prince of Peace Abbey in Oceanside, like synagogue Adat Yeshurun in La Jolla, St. Timothy's has done a good job integrating modest architectural materials with indigenous landscape. When I drove into the church parking lot, I could smell white sage.

St. Timothy's respect for native plants made me want to like the church. My reception had been a bit frosty. But suburban churches have a high turnover and often aren't as convivial as urban churches. (I've read that North County residents move every five years.) I liked St. Timothy's formal but unfussy liturgy. I liked the way Reverend Acton crossed himself and bowed during the Incarnatus because, out of everyone else present, only one person, an older woman, genuflected during that portion of the Creed. I reckoned that Reverend Acton crossed himself and bowed during the Incarnatus not only out of respect for the older woman's sensibilities, but perhaps also in recognition of the broad range of practice within the Episcopal Church.

I also liked Reverend Acton's bossy sermon on Mark 10: 17–27, the story of the rich man who asked Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal

Reverend Acton told us, "You cannot possess the Kingdom of God when trying so hard to possess the Kingdom of God becomes just another thing in your life, one other aspiration among many. Career? House? Status? Reputation? Is it possible to let go and embrace the Kingdom of God when attaining so many other things is as important?"

During Communion I went to the restroom. On my return, two women confronted me outside the nave. One of the women identified herself as a Reuters reporter who attended St. Timothy's. The other said she was Reverend Acton's wife. Both women had noticed my camera bag. They asked what I was doing at their church. I identified myself. I explained my job. By way of explanation I said that since the Episcopal Church was in an uproar over the election of a gay bishop in New Hampshire, and since the Roman Catholic Church was agonized by the Holy Father's poor health, I'd become interested in "how big issues

trickled down to the local

parish." Reverend Acton's

wife explained to me three times that the Roman Catholic Church and the Episcopal Church were separate entities. The Reuters reporter asked me twice if I'd been videotaping Reverend Acton. She said that the election of the gay bishop in New Hampshire had agitated people in the Episcopal Church. As if to demonstrate the degree of this agitation, Reverend Acton's wife darted into the nave to whisper into Reverend Acton's ear, thereby bearing false witness and paving the way for his public declaration of my presence.

"Are you with the national press?" Reverend Acton asked when, after the benediction, he shook my hand.

I told him who I was.

He said, "I'm sorry, I thought...'

I couldn't say, "Forget it." I could think only how I'd noticed that

nowadays among ardent conservatives and ardent liberals, whenever there's a controversy or "cause" in the air, people forget their manners and indulge

When we were seated in Reverend Acton's office, he told me that his parish was among those opposed to the election of the gay bishop in New Hampshire. But I'd already gotten a feel for how big issues trickled down to the local parish. I became interested in our conversation only when Reverend Acton told me that he'd been ordained when he was 24 years old. He told me he'd been raised a Unitarian, but came to the Episcopal Church while experiencing a "profound spiritual crisis" as an undergrad at UCSB.

"The school chaplain happened to be an Episcopal priest. He was the first person in my life who really listened to me talk and ask questions about basic spiritual matters.

'What I liked most about the Episcopal Church was that you didn't have to leave your brain behind when you walked in the front door."







"If your concerns are related to threats from the drug cartel in Mexico, the cost is probably going to go up."

My Uncle Max lives in Fiji and he is coming to town. He is a man with great regard for his personal well-being. After making a ton of money in the stock market back in the '80s, he checked out of American life and moved to Fiji. Rarely has he traveled since. But when he does take a trip, it is a production.

This visit he's bringing his girlfriend, Theresa, to meet the family. Theresa, a Texas oil widow, is a woman of means, and they intend to hit some high-society events while on the mainland. And, I suspect partly for show, Uncle Max wants to hire a bodyguard for his woman and her gems, and he's asked me to find one for him.

My first call was to Darryl Thibault, managing director of Pexis Corporation. "The first thing that any bodyguard is going to ask you is what is the nature of your threat," he explained. "An interview is the first step to get a better feel for what is involved. Are you concerned about kidnapping? Are you concerned about your personal safety? Are you concerned because of political terrorists? What is the nature of the threat?"

Thibault explained the reason for the background information. "The main reason for determining the threat is to determine the extent of the bodyguarding. Do you want someone who is armed?; a concealed weapon, or an exposed weapon as a deterrent? Are you going to stay in one area or are you going to be traveling? If you travel across state lines, with any flying, obviously you are going to have problems with weapons. And how many people will be involved? Will it be in a vehicle or in an office setting or outdoors? These are the sorts of questions that you would ask. And, depending upon the answers we get, we would put together a program that might involve one person or it might involve a team.

"The cost," Thibault continued, "would also be a function of the nature or the threat. For instance, if your concerns are related to threats from the drug cartel in Mexico or something along that nature, the cost is probably going to go up. It is probably a more serious threat than if it is an irate spouse."

What sort of training do bodyguards have?

"There is fairly extensive training that a bodyguard goes into and it has to do with everything from weapons use to intelligence. One thing you have to keep in mind is that an effective bodyguard is one who will keep one out of harm. In other words, through advance collection of information, you'll know how to prevent anything from happening. Frequently, if one gets into a confrontation, that often indicates an unsuccessful bodyguarding operation. So a large part of bodyguarding is the initial collection of intelligence. A part of the operation would involve identifying escape routes; it would involve identifying where the nearest hospitals are, depending upon where you are going to be in case one has to go to a hospital. There is quite a bit more [to body-guarding] than just being there with a weapon."

Thibault says a lot of bodyguards are former federal agents. "You get a full range, a lot of them are from the FBI, the CIA, and the Secret Service. Probably most are drawn from these three areas."

What should I look for in a personal bodyguard?

"You would look at his background training and experience. But if you are going to have a personal bodyguard around you for a long time, you are going to want someone that you can develop a relationship with."

Thibault added, "A major problem for bodyguards, with regard to the subjects they are protecting, is that most subjects do not want to have their lifestyle

interrupted. And they can make it very challeng-

ing. Early on, one has to decide how much influence you are going to allow the bodyguard to have on you. For instance, you may be used to going to work the same way every day and the bodyguard is probably going to force you to vary that route so that you don't take the same

route to and from work every day. And he is going to do other things that are going to make it more difficult for anyone that might be targeting you. And that is going to inevitably cost you to a certain extent in inconvenience and things of that nature."

Can you hire a bodyguard for the day? "Absolutely," replied Thibault. "Typically there is a minimum of four hours. I don't know of any bodyguard that would deploy himself for less than four hours. Twenty-four hours is more typical."

What is the price for a day?

"It will depend on the threat, but it ranges from about \$45 an hour to \$150 an hour. We currently have several operations going where we have 24-hour armed guards in place. And when we have a longer period like that, we will work out a contract with a client instead of an hourly basis."

Frank Duenas, president and CEO of Guardsmen Protective Service, says his company charges from \$50 to \$100 an hour for an armed bodyguard. "We do a lot of escort to courts for domestic violence or child-custody protection."

Bradley Security & Detective Agency charges \$75 an hour for a bodyguard.

XL Excell Security said their price for a bodyguard depends on a number of things: what degree of coverage they desire, who they are, what their profile is, if there is an immediate threat. Call for a price.







It's an August midafternoon in El Cajon. It's 100 degrees, and the sane people are in the shade, keeping still. Not Mike Davis. For an hour, the most famous social historian of Southern California has been walking me through Bostonia, a two-square-mile enclave just north of El Cajon, where he grew up in the '50s and '60s. With hat and sunglasses, I'm burning up; head and eyes uncovered, Davis beads a lone ball of sweat. Having lived in Los Angeles, London, New York, and Hawaii, he has once again settled in San Diego. Though he's fidgety about being back, he seems at home in East County, especially since he's been writing about the place that made him. The author of *City of Quartz* and other books about L.A.'s past and future woes has, with two local authors, just written a new book, *Under the Perfect Sun: The San Diego Tourists Never See.* It's a history of local sleaze, in "the most corrupt city on the West Coast," beginning with His Highness of Corruption, Alonzo Horton, and ending with Her Majesty of Folly, Susan Golding.

Later, Davis asks whether I'd like to get a drink at Dumont's tavern, a

Hells Angels hangout on El Cajon Boulevard. "You don't mind if we get beat up, do you?" In June, the Angels' clubhouse, near Dumont's, was raided by a multiagency task force, and today 18 Hells Angels or associates are in jail. According to the *Union-Tribune*, they've been indicted on "a long list of charges that include drug trafficking, racketeering and plans to kill members

of a rival club." While the U.S. Attorney's Office boasts of having, with this bust, "eliminated [the] scourge" of a "drug trafficking ring" that moved "marijuana, cocaine and methamphetamine throughout the United States from Mexico," Davis looks beyond all that to a kindred vision he has with the bikers.

A radical still at 57, Davis stands with those of whatever stripe who

picket, subvert, refuse allegiance to, and revolt against the corporate, cultural, and political interests that control our lives. After the fall of Communism, Davis is a political anomaly, whose self-definition is now puckishly ironic: "I am a socialist in the same sense that Billy Graham is a Baptist." With short gray hair and a trimmed beard, Davis exhibits a chumminess more ursine than affable. He loves discussing the militancy of subcultures, be it the Hells Angels or Los Angeles developers, the latter the bête noire of his best sellers, City of Quartz: Excavating the Future in Los Angeles (1990) and Ecology of Fear: Los Angeles and the *Imagination of Disaster* (1998). These books, along with Davis's teaching, editing, and other writing about California environmental, labor, and social history, have garnered him two prestigious awards: a Getty fellowship, in 1997, and the so-called genius grant, a MacArthur fellowship, in 1998.


Inside Dumont's, the singlelighted pool table, the cool dark, and the jukebox rhythms feel friendly, down home. One Angel behind the bar and another breaking a rack may be all that's left of the local band. I sense Davis's comfort in a place most would call hostile; such ease allows him to explain how he, a precocious adolescent, was politicized during the 1960s. "I thought," Davis says, quaffing a beer, that "El Cajon was the heart of darkness. San Diego to me was alive. I loved downtown; I loved coming to the city." That view shattered when Davis joined the civil rights movement in 1962. He discovered the "fanatical opposition to racial justice here" and experienced "the violent reaction



to civil rights demonstrations that I was in." It was a time, he says, when the *San Diego Union*, under editor Herb Klein, was "in league with the Christian anti-Communist crusade. I started asking my father about who runs San Diego, and he told me about C. Arnholt Smith and Irving Kahn and the Alessio brothers." Davis had no idea that his beloved city was ruled by robber barons, let alone that he might plumb their exploitation one day with a leftist critique.

Years later, Davis would meet David Reid, a political historian and the editor of *Sex*, *Death and God in L.A.*, who also grew up in San Diego in the '50s. As former San Diegans, the two wondered why this town has "as noirish a history as any city in the Sun Belt" and yet "still manages to get by

with its sunny image." The culmination of Davis's thinking about local political history has gone into *Under the Perfect Sun* and his 127-page section, "The Next Little Dollar: The Private Governments of San Diego." Two more sections tap a similar vein. In "Just Another Day in Paradise? An Episodic History of Rebellion and Repression in America's Finest City," San Diego City College professor Jim Miller documents the role of the Industrial Workers of the World, ethnic-based protest, and unions in the city's working-class past. In "Life in Vacationland: The 'Other' San Diego," City College professor Kelly Mayhew presents interviews with current and former local activists as well as new immigrants. David Reid's foreword to the book begins, "A city is a body of fate, but

# **Wilson Devolves**

HIS IMAGE IS NO LONGER ONE OF BEING CONCERNED WITH THE WELFARE OF SAN DIEGO, BUT OF ONE WHO IS CONCERNED WITH THE WELFARE OF PETE WILSON.

The following is Chapter 19 of Under the Perfect Sun.

In his second and third terms, Pete Wilson, the soft furry mammal, began his famous transformation into a fierce scaled reptile. It was a devolution dictated, of course, by his environment. If post-Smith San Diego was temporarily Middle Earth, the world outside remained Jurassic Park. California Republican politics in the late 1970s were dominated by huge flesh-eating dinosaurs like Ed Meese, Evelle Younger, and George Deukmejian. Watergate may have tamed the GOP elsewhere, but not the party led by Ronald Reagan. To compete in this larger world, Pete Wilson had to change his diet from soufflé to trade unionists and welfare mothers.

First, however, he had to consolidate his hold on City Hall. The 1975 election — in the shadow of

Nixon's götterdämmerung — has been described as a repeat of the legendary 1915 contest between "smokestacks" and "geraniums." Wilson faced Lee Hubbard, a cement contractor with seemingly bottomless financing from SEED. He outspent Wilson two to one. Likewise, progrowth money poured into the campaigns of candidates trying to unseat Wilson's crucial council allies, especially those nominal Democrats O'Connor and Williams, most susceptible to charges that they were anti—new jobs.

It was the last hurrah of Wilson as righteous geranium. "We don't want to be another sprawled-out Los Angeles monster," he militantly told voters. One of his key

planks was that there was "no case" for a huge proposed development on the North City land reserve that was supposedly offlimits to development until the build-out of the city core sometime in the mid-1990s. Tampering with the urban reserve was also opposed by the tiny neighboring city of Del Mar, whose rusticity would be imperiled by "North City West." Leading the Del Mar resistance were three names soon to be San Diego household words: council members Nancy Hoover and Tom Shepard and Del Mar's ambitious city attorney Roger Hedgecock, who typed himself "the young Pete Wilson" and was preparing to run for the county board of supervisors. In the election Wilson and his key allies easily survived the deluge of developer money. But at the very moment that their victory was consolidating "slow growth" as a political majority, the mayor was beginning to

unfortunately the world cannot be persuaded that San Diego is anything other than a sunny congery of tourist attractions. Here, crimes, follies, and misfortunes that would stupefy and amaze if they were set in New York or Los Angeles do not intrigue beyond the county line. Historically, it seems San Diego cannot represent itself, and is barely represented by others."

In a phone interview, Reid discusses with me his admiration for Davis's work. "The organizing principle of Mike's books is the urban peril of the working class and the mixed multitudes of the city." There's "a certain kind of urban sensibility that he had a lot to do with crystallizing. He brought an extraordinary and compendiously learned sociological and geological perspective to this kind of noir environment, which now seems to be so irresistible as to have been inevitable. But at the time" Davis started writing, "it really wasn't."

Davis is a rare bird: a Marxist academic and an urban/environmental historian whom

people outside academe read and take seriously. (Sales of City of Quartz have, by Davis's estimate, topped 150,000.) I'd wager that most San Diegans know little about Davis; however, his influence in university and political circles, especially in Los Angeles, is legendary. When running for mayor of L.A., Richard Riordan invited Davis to lunch but left soon after Davis told him, "We have absolutely nothing in common politically." Davis tells me that "All my books are written with a desire to annoy or

anger people who have power and money. They are all partisan." Davis was among the first to rail at the overbuilt and overcapitalized Southland. His articles, many for socialist reviews and labor periodicals, bristle with phrases like "the privatization of public space" and "the globalization of fear."

Writing about San Diego has not been at the top of his "intellectual work list." But when Davis returned — in early 2002, his wife got a job at Mesa College and Davis became a tenured professor at

the University of California, Irvine, commuting from San Diego to teach three classes per week — he joined forces with two "wonderful young activists" (husband and wife Miller and Mayhew), who were analyzing the city beyond its promilitary, pro-GOP past. The book got him "to think about the political history of San Diego and the privatewealth strategies that underlie and drive that political history."

Most historians who write about an urban political economy, Davis says, see it as a "growth machine, a coalition of interests that use city government to promote a certain kind of growth. I'm arguing," in *Under* the Perfect Sun, that "it's a lot more complicated than that. What has to be reconstructed are particular wealth strategies, whether it's old money trying to recapitalize downtown real estate; or it's John D. Spreckels trying to control all the key infrastructures of the city; or it's Irving Kahn trying to use Mafia-tainted Teamster money to accelerate the development of North County; or it's John Moores trying to transplant himself into downtown as a developer — these are not just interests, they're strategies, projections of interests, which then get translated into politics."

San Diego, Davis believes, is remarkably different from other major American cities, where "you have greater countervailing forces exerted by labor, the civil rights movement, environmental groups, or other constituencies. Here you have, with the exception of the Pete Wilson years, exceptionally weak city government and exceptionally wellorganized and powerful private interests able to take city and county politics and play them with real virtuosity, beginning with the great John D. Spreckels himself." Davis thinks the San Diego government is a "private utility"; that is, whatever business leaders and developers want is rubberstamped by planning boards and city councils. In our time, one need only recall the carte blanche given to the sports enterprises of John Moores and Alex Spanos. To accomplish its growth, San Diego seeks its investors from elsewhere and every decade or so invites in a new multimillionaire carpetbagger. In the last decade, John Moores has filled the bill. But Moores, as yet unindicted, may end up facing jail for the collapse of Peregrine Systems, so, Davis wonders, "Who'll be the next corporate savior?"

Ask any San Diegan on the street for a decent chronicle of San Diego's past and you'll come up empty. For Davis, San Diego historiography is a wasteland — "bits and

pieces," he says, "nothing serious." In any standard book on Southern California or the Sun Belt, San Diego "is off the map." Even State Librarian Kevin Starr, who's finishing a multivolume history of the Golden State, has "1 chapter out of 100 chapters on San Diego." Davis isn't sure why our fair city is blind to its own past. He ventures a couple of ideas. "One is the huge, oppressive weight of the Union-Tribune, which set about not just to be a newspaper but to control history, opinion, heritage, everything. Second is that those who might write that history leave San Diego."

Since Davis has studied growth doctrines of the Los Angeles region, I wondered how he would contrast theirs with ours. Los Angeles grew very fast in the postwar era because "it sacrificed landscape for industry." San Diego grew at a slower pace — until recently — because the city tended to preserve landscape from industry. Preserving open spaces was, of course, a good thing. But wealthy fathers here did this not because they loved geraniums and the gardening creed of Kate Sessions. Nor were San Diego's canyons and coasts protected because elected officials were representing the people's will. On the contrary, Davis says, they did it knowing that "landscape is a form of capital that attracts a particular kind of economy and social system." Indeed, San Diego attracted a professional middle class, but it never barred the door. As a result, our mesas have been engulfed by sprawl. Additionally, Los Ange-

les's labor movement, a costar of industrial expansion, was much more powerful than San Diego's nonunionized working class. People of color have been essential to Los Angeles's political livelihood; minorities in San

Diego have seldom had much influence, even now. Despite San Diego's being on the border, the Latinization of this community has been slower than Los Angeles's because of, Davis says, the lack of local manufacturing jobs.

Beers quaffed, we're driving on Main Street through the "new" El Cajon, that is, redevelopment central. In most American cities, nearly all the classy urban landmarks, such as El Cajon's old downtown theater, have been leveled in the misguided notion that trendy malls and dance clubs will draw people back. It's nuts, Davis says. When cities "tear down the pre-'50s stuff, a few years later they end up rebuilding some faux version of it." Describing the vagaries of El Cajon, Davis's voice plies equal parts sarcasm and tenderness. "It's the heart of darkness," he says, "and it's not."

Originally, the El Cajon Valley — where Davis's parents first settled in California — was a Spanish land grant called the El Cajon Ranch. In the late 1800s, Northern Californian millionaires, like "Lucky" Baldwin and Isaac Lankershim, who were flush with Comstock money, came south to buy

With a partner, Lankershim purchased the San Fernando Valley, then gobbled up the El Cajon Valley by himself, subdividing it into three ranchos and making raisins the big crop. The northern part of the valley was sold to investors from Boston, who named the tract Bostonia. Years would pass before this swath of land, teeming with small citrus farms, would raise a mercantile center.

Davis shows me a house in Winter Gardens, just north of Bostonia. This is the house that his father, Dwight Davis, built with the help of two Yugoslavian butchers. Davis's parents bought the lot in 1937, nine years before Davis was born. His father believed the El Cajon Valley was Eden. A photo of the time shows Dwight Davis slouching jauntily with Western hat beside his wife and relatives in front of his gated par-

wooden arch on which "Ranchito" is painted, a common nickname for tiny estates. Davis compares an old photo with the remodeled home before us. "This would have been called an urban farm lot. A couple of acres of trees and a cottage." Depression-era boosters promoted the land in Bostonia and Winter Gardens as "99 dollars for two acres with piped water," perfect for raising fruit trees and chickens. The thing that attracted his father, Davis recalls, was the "franchised vision — the little bungalow out of Sunset magazine. During the Depression, you didn't have to sell a place like this. The place sold itself." Living in Winter Gardens before the war "was the single most happiest time in my parents' lives."

there his father had the only white-collar job of his life, conducting "background loyalty investigations for the federal government," Davis relates in an email. Mike Davis was born in Fontana. (He later wrote a bittersweet chapter in *City of Quartz*, called "Junk-

yard of Dreams," tracing the rise and fall of this community.) In 1951, the family returned to San Diego, his dad's eye still on a backcountry prize. They lived first in East San Diego, where Davis's mother, Mary (Ryan) Davis, an urban spirit who didn't drive,

cherished the proximity to downtown. Two years later, when Davis was six, the family moved to Bostonia and a house on Flamingo Avenue.

Describing his family, Davis says they were "as close to a 1950s average as you can get. My mother was a Catholic; my father came from a Protestant background. My mother was a Republican; my father was a trade-union Democrat, a party-liner. My mother was a big-city Irish girl who grew up in Germantown, the Catholic neighborhood of Columbus [Ohio]; my father was a farm boy" from western Ohio. Davis's Ohio heritage accounts for his "Midwestern ethnicity" and makes up half his identity.

Davis's father worked at Superior Meat Company in downtown San Diego. He spent "equal parts of the day selling meat, cutting meat, and delivering meat, half white-collar, half bluecollar." Davis's uncle, who lived on Mount

Helix and owned a wholesale meat-packing company, "was a gambler and a very charismatic guy. Everyone adored him." Though his businessman uncle "should have been a Republican," he was a registered Democrat and both of his kids married people of color. Interracial marriage was the only "unusual" thing about his family. Jim Stone, Davis's cousin's husband, would be one of the founders of the Congress of Racial Equality in San Diego. Joining the group in 1962 with his girlfriend and a buddy, Davis learned firsthand about racism, San Diego style.


This crack in the family's political affiliations inspired Davis once to visit the place of his father's heritage — the Welshspeaking community in Venedocia, near the headwaters of the Wabash River in western Ohio. There, looking through the graveyard, Davis found "row after row of my relatives" who died at















Antietam and Shiloh. "Then the penny dropped: this was an abolitionist stronghold. These Welsh farm boys weren't fighting to save the Union; they were fighting to end slavery. My theory is that the liberal inclination in the family history comes from the Welsh side, with some religious-based abolitionism."

Davis's mother was a pistol. She was "like one of those old Appalachian women with a corncob pipe who'd chew your ear for two hours." She was also an ironist. Davis once asked her, " 'Do you think there's been any truly good statesmen in America in the 20th Century?' 'Yes,' she said, 'Calvin Coolidge.' She always felt trapped in Bostonia because she was a big-city person. She hated El Cajon as much as my father loved it." And yet his parents couldn't understand why their son wanted to leave the state after high school. After the trials of the Depression, "They thought this was the land of bread and honey."

Of his parents, Davis says they were "extremely loving but utterly uncomprehending of me. I grew up in a home where the only books were the Bible and one volume of Reader's Digest Condensed Books. My father read the newspaper, cover to cover. My parents were high school graduates" with few interests "beyond the drama of family life and sports. My rebellions and problems caused them tremendous consternation and pain. My father always attempted to be understanding. My mother was very tough, like a Marine Corps drill instructor. I'd come home from elementary school and say some

boy picked on me; my father would say, 'Don't worry about it. Just turn the other cheek.' My mother would drag me out in the yard and say, 'You're fighting Irish, and if you don't go out and fight that kid, you'll fight me.'
And the kids, no matter how big they were, were always considerably less terrifying to me than my mother."
His mother so identified with the Irish cause that when she

visited Ireland, even in

block, that I was like my father. I realized I wasn't like my father at all. To an occult extent, I'm like my mother, even when it comes to my ethnic identification. I automatically say I'm an Irishman." This affinity for the Irish — the other half of his identity — drew Davis to marry an Irishwoman in 1981. Roisin, a daughter from that marriage, and Jack, a son from another marriage, have

lived much of their lives in Ireland, where Davis visits them every summer.

"I would say of the kids and families I knew, I was extraordinarily lucky to have had so much love. But even the love couldn't compensate for the savagery and the stupidity of El Cajon at a certain point. Racism, religious fundamentalism, the cultural desert, the emptiness of it — I could see this eating away even at my mother, her deep unhappiness. Just merely living in East San Diego had been so much better" for her, since she "could take buses and get around. I saw this in all my friends as well. I saw them taking flight from families, from divorces, from fathers and mothers battling. My other great rebellion was against this class. This began to be apparent, maybe in sixth grade, junior high school, then catastrophically in high school, where class or status divisions

became clear."

'50s. Fry's Hardware has been replaced by an auto-parts dealer; the Bostonia Store, one of the oldest general stores in the West, lasting from 1886 to 1960, is now a Chevron station; and Smokey Rodgers's Bostonia Ballroom, where Spade Cooley, the King of Western Swing, once played, is today the Red Mill restaurant. As we drive by, Davis remembers that "Bostonia is like many other communities in Southern California: little agricultural hamlets and crossroads that bore post office addresses but were never incorporated." Such outposts "disappeared beneath the lava of postwar development."

As we walk through his old neighborhood, Davis points out several narrow yet deep lots. Why deep? For chickens. Citrus trees needed five years before they yielded fruit, while chickens provided immediate income. We pass the site of Val's chicken plant, once thriving, now an empty field. "This was an enormous plant where they killed and plucked chickens. Chicken waste you can smell a mile away. The

plant depressed home values, but it also gave the neighborhood its character."

Davis is fascinated by how individual communities, each with its own story, can be different from the cities they become lumped into. Consult the 2000 census and you'll see that Bostonia's population is 15,169, which is about 7800 people per square mile, the same as the density in the city of Los Angeles. By contrast, El Cajon has 6800 people per square mile, and San Diego, fewer than 3800 people per square mile. Why are Bostonia and El Cajon so dense? Starting in the 1960s, both towns

summons dozens of scenes from his boyhood: retired farmers from Minnesota who lived across the street; early girlfriends; boys whose dads were swabbies and worked at the 32nd Street Naval Station; a next-door neighbor who to Davis's delight put in a go-kart track in his back yard. But tragedy — always unelaborated by families — also stalked the block and nearby homes. Across the road was a bully named Gordon Neumann, in Davis's mind, "the devil." In 1993, on Mollison Avenue in El Cajon, Neumann shot six children, killing one of them, and shot to death a 40-year-old woman. Neumann then burned himself alive in his apartment. "I saw that story, didn't see the name, but I instantly knew who the

man who hated children was. I remember in second grade, *right there*, with him sitting on top of me, pounding me. My father came out and almost killed him."

The supreme horror of his childhood took place in 1958, around the corner from Flamingo on Second Street. "I remember on summer evenings in Bostonia," Davis says, "we used to burn our trash in our back yard. Very frequently you could hear somebody being beaten — usually a woman or a child. People didn't speak about that." When he was 12, he was walking around with a friend and came upon the bungalow of the Pendergasts, where a family of six lived, and there Davis saw "every sheriff's car in the world. I was later able to peer in one of the windows: it looked like somebody had taken a bucket of red paint and thrown it on the walls. The guy who lived here had four children, and he moved in a 16-yearold boy with his family. While he was at work, the boy, whose name was Carl Eder," slit the throats of the wife and the children. (Davis

most communities do not — retirement homes. Davis says the El Cajon Valley became "a kind of receptacle for sick people, aging people, poor people, and troubled people. I charitably describe it as the social dumping ground for San Diego." Once the 94 freeway was constructed, "Then El Cajon could really become a dormitory for the city."

We pass Greenfield Drive, home now to auto-repair shops, still one of the main entrepreneurial enterprises of East County. We pass the rubble base of an air-raid siren that used to blow (as a test) Mondays at noon and approach Davis's old home on Flamingo





says it was later reported that the father had forced himself sexually on Eder; learning that fact bothered Davis as much as the killings did.) Caught a few days later wandering in Mission Beach, Eder said he did it because the kids were making too much noise. He also said, "I flipped my lid." At 16, he was ineligible for the death penalty. In 1974 he escaped from prison and has never been captured.

Though the mass murder disturbed him, Davis doesn't think he was traumatized. "We didn't deliberately repress it. We had no context. This was the problem with growing up here. We didn't have contexts, or points of comparison, or larger universes. I remember as a kid, I was incredibly patriotic until I was 15. And I'd always be thinking how I would explain to some Russian boy my age how wonderful the United States was. But then I'd get to the point of explaining El Cajon to them and I would always falter. The unspoken thing — the sound of somebody being beaten, the religious intolerance and,

above all, the sheer stupidity of it. Not that the people were stupid. The people I grew up with are fully as smart as I am, some of the smartest people I've ever known. We were growing up in the depth of the '50s cold war culture, which now, for some reason, thirtysomethings have nostalgia for -Formica and Eisenhower."

Religion, then and now, is "a huge factor" in El Cajon. Davis's family was Catholic and hardly mixed in the Bostonian stew of fundamentalists, Mormons, and Baptists. An atheist at ten, Davis was interested in science and "quickly determined that science and religion were incompatible. Being Catholic in a ridiculously fundamentalist town meant you got into far too many fistfights over religion."

Despite Davis's penchant for science, he began to turn off to school, ironically, because his bookishness was singled out in sixth grade. "All my rebellion," Davis says, "goes back to that." In the wake of the *Sputnik* launch and the first monkey in space,

school officials pressed IQ tests on promising students. Davis scored very high, and his science savvy was identified as a weapon in the war against Communism. Davis didn't want to be singled out, however; he wanted to remain with his friends. And yet his desire to belong was as troublesome as it was natural. The same conundrum came up for Davis in 1967, when he struck back at the American political system and joined the Communist Party. Within two years, he was kicked out for being anti-Soviet.

Indicative of how rigid class assumptions were during the 1950s, Davis recalls meeting another malcontent, "Stinky" Lenois, at Grossmont Continuation High School. Lenois was "considered to be the first- or second-toughest guy and the dirtiest fighter in El Cajon. A hoodlum. Everybody kicked him out of school; teachers despised him. One day he invited me to his house. He told me he was going to show me something, but it was a secret, and if I divulged this to anybody else he would kill me." (At this point, I'm laughing. It's a rich tale. Davis only smiles, and that to himself. At times it's hard to gauge the ironic innuendo.) "So I'm very excited. Maybe he's going to show me a gun, maybe some marijuana, which we'd heard about but nobody had seen, maybe some pornography. Whatever it was it was going to be really good. He reaches under his bed, pulls out a little box, and takes out several of the Mentor books — [one] by Will Durant and [another] the thoughts of Plato — and he says, 'I want to talk to you about philosophy. But if you tell anybody about this, I'll kill your fucking ass.' These people did not go on to become part of the editorial committee of the New Left Review like I did. But they were the people whose refusal to accept the boxes they were put in was enormously important to

me."

One such person was Davis's high school girlfriend, Darcie Whitacre, whose commitment to youthful political activity equaled his. When they graduated, Davis left with a four-year scholarship, while she pocketed a \$25 certificate to a local beauty college. Whitacre "stayed and prospered" in San Diego by starting a Montessori school. For him, Whitacre is a local hero, one who farmed while others fled. Though he has no regrets about leaving El Cajon, he still has a "feeling that somehow I let her down."

The teenage Davis, of course, couldn't resist acting his age. The day before graduation he "held a can of beer" and watched a friend smash the school's windows with a baseball bat; for a time, Davis stole cars, before his mother turned him over to the police; he drank often and one night barely survived being pinned under the car in a terrible wreck. A buddy, Brent Lawson, pulled him out and saved his life. A foot-and-a-halflong scar from that accident courses along

his left thigh. His adolescence was one of group rather than individual consciousness. The group he joined then would "be like the Goths today. We tried to look like beatniks." He was differently called and sought not to hide his calling. His last time trick-or-treating, in junior high, he went as Fidel Castro.

In many ways, Mike Davis has become the Fidel Castro of urban political theory uncompromising, audacious, built to last. To get there entailed the grind of study — at 28, he began with UCLA; moved on to the University of Glasgow, in Scotland; returned to UCLA and passed his Ph.D. exams but never finished his dissertation; then went to Belfast and finally to London, where he joined the editorial committee at the New Left Review and worked at Verso, the radical publisher. His first book, Prisoners of the American Dream, came out in 1986, the result of transatlantic study. In it Davis examined why the American working class is different from working

classes in other industrialized countries and what this meant in the age of Ronald Reagan. Soon, Davis was in the States once more, writing City of Quartz. That book was new in two important ways: one, no one had ever so fully documented how Los Angeles and its surrounding communities had so quickly lost their paradisal sensibilities to the rapacity of developers; and two, in order to render a city as hard and opaque as Los Angeles, Davis forged a prose style that cut and uncovered with surgical precision.

During the hours I interviewed Davis, he spoke nonstop. His

writing clips at the same gait. One critic notes that Davis's sentences possess a kind of "breathlessness," making him like Noam Chomsky, another "rebel without a pause." Talking or writing, Davis builds up strata of facts, statistics, data, analysis, historical incidents, zoning ordinances, planning regulations, school-board decisions — all of it buttressed by hundreds of footnotes. The effect is a kind of multilevel assemblage, a rhetorical Horton Plaza, where an open-air slit is traversed by walkways and escalators that invariably get people both immersed and lost.

Davis's own metaphor appears in a 1994 interview with the Chicago Review, in which he called his style "sheer bricolage. It has to do with what a good bricklayer does or somebody building a stone fence." His key influence has been the German social critic Walter Benjamin: "Reading him taught me that small concrete things could be pregnant with the whole, that oblique points of view could sometimes render things visible in more depth." Such is the technique of City of Quartz: using this indirect method, Davis makes his critical points apparent though he never states them in so many words.

success as a socialist

As to his unlikely

author, Davis wonders "what I should complain about. Is it the people who've attacked me or is it the people who like my books for all the wrong reasons? I actually think the stranger phenomenon is, why did City of Quartz become so popular? This is a book with an almost 100-page chapter on homeowners' associations. It's not a book I ever expected to sell more than 100 copies. Not only did it sell decently, but it gave me this entrée to people and worlds which were actually the targets of my critique." Davis says developers called him to discuss planning codes because no one understood the "architecture of control" in Los Angeles as he did. Indeed, Davis's sober conclusions helped to fuel the late-'80s "Stop Los Angelization" movement beyond L.A. Preserving open space is now central to the environmental consciousness of cities everywhere.

With Davis's third book, *Ecology of Fear*, the honeymoon ended.

In a chapter called "The Case for Letting Malibu Burn," Davis argued that an inordinate amount of city services and money went every year to battle fires in tiny-populated Malibu, and these resources were redirected from the larger and needier population of Los Angeles. Not surprisingly, Davis was attacked by Malibu realtors with such ferocity that the Los Angeles Times assigned one of its reporters to check every Davis footnote (831, to be exact) for miscues. (The Times found a few errors and minor exaggerations but, worse, according to Davis, refused to publish his response; other publications, like the Nation, supported Davis.) The Times attack, in the late 1990s, was a painful period for Davis, in part, because his five marriages were touted as proof of his untrustworthiness. Today he avoids the "showmanship" of media relations. Moreover, he won't allow others to play politics with his private life. Ad hominem invective, a legacy of the anti-Clinton years, is still double-barreled against the





left by the likes of Ann Coulter and Roger Hedgecock. "This isn't politics or political analysis," Davis says. "It's a political culture" run amok, "which is the problem."

Though Davis believes he chronicled how urban pressures are threatening our lives, critics, he says, misread him. Ecology of Fear has been "described as nothing but pure darkness, when, in fact, the whole point is, Southern California's disasters and apocalypses are social constructions." Davis has been lumped in with the fantasy seekers who, as one critic put it, "love to see Los Angeles burn." Kill the messenger and you need not heed his message, he says. What most people won't recognize is that "the whole genre of urban apocalyptic literature" is a "racialized discourse," with a "surprisingly sinister undertone." In other words, people intent on destroying Los Angeles seek, with élan, to wipe out the multicultural collective that Southern

California has become.

human-engineered; nature's coming inferno will be far more lethal. As Davis cataloged the natural disruptions in Los Angeles's history tornadoes, mud slides, fires — he was surprised by three things: disasters occur regularly; the media covers them unequally; and they are always labeled "catastrophes, unusual, exceptional," which, in Davis's mind, makes them the opposite of what they really are: to be expected. "Far from having had too many earthquakes recently, we've had too few," Davis continues. "Far from experiencing extreme weather recently, we're not yet back to the extreme weather patterns" of California's long history, "regardless of global warming. In other words, here's a whole civilization constructed on a misrecognition of nature, built on records too short to capture the natural fluctuations of the environment. We've mortgaged our safety and prosperity against it. And then, when what I call 'ordinary' disasters happen, they are, of course, the end

of the world."

Urban calamities today distort our thinking. People confuse, Davis says, "the social with the natural — so that natural disasters appear to us as man-made, and social problems are naturalized. We talk about the 'wildings' of street gangs. They have the properties of wild animals. Coyotes get confused with gang members. Everything is mixed up. And it's particularly mixed up by people who live on the urban edge, next to nature, which remains truly and magnificently wild despite all our efforts to tame it. And,

of course, in San Diego as much as in Los Angeles, people want to live near that wildness, but they want an impermeable boundary between themselves

and it. It doesn't exist." For a range of original ideas about the stresses of urban life, Davis received, in 1998, a MacArthur fellowship, \$315,000 in cash. Utterly surprised, he was told by a former MacArthur winner and friend that the award would be "a mixed blessing." Today he agrees. "The foundation people are wonderful," he says. "They just give you the money. No strings

attached. But I find the whole idea of the MacArthur odious. I wouldn't defend the MacArthur. At the same time, if the Brinks truck comes in my neighborhood and the money sack falls off, I'm not taking it to the police department, because, for one thing, my family would lynch me if I did. I took that windfall but always wished" for another outcome, "as in my favorite movie, The Loneliness of the Long-Distance Runner — the working-class kid is about to win the race for his reform school and he refuses to win because he refuses to be a success for them. At some level, it would have been hugely satisfying to just throw it back in their faces. But it would have been treason to give up the money."

Davis says the gift at first resembles the old Millionaire TV show from the 1950s, where a man shows up out of the blue and bestows a million dollars upon a needy person. "It doesn't work that way. There's an old-boy network. MacArthurs nominate [new] MacArthurs. Somebody told me once that if you get a prestigious fellowship, then you get the others, which seems kind of senseless." These fellowships, though, arrived when Davis, a single parent, was barely staying afloat, teaching at four different schools. "I needed the equivalent of two full-time jobs to make ends meet."

A decade before his awards, Davis was driving a truck six days a week, hauling blanketwrapped furniture to Las Vegas, and teaching at UCLA the seventh day. The few hours he spent before the blackboard were far more lucrative than the

money he earned behind the wheel. By earning a college degree, he says, "I took the easy way out. I'm a tenured professor." Davis holds a nostalgia for truck driving and disparages where he's at now. His professional class is "overpaid and overindulged, while blue-collar people are running in place" in an economy today that insists on "longer hours and harder work" than at any time since the 1930s. What did he do with the MacArthur and Getty money? "I wasted it on travel, gave it away to family and dependents, bought revolutionary posters," which bellow in reds and grays from nearly every wall of his Golden Hill home. "A smart person would have banked the money, bought property. Not me."

In early August 1960, San Diego teens and young adults were racing their cars at Hourglass Field, an old airstrip, under the supervision of the San Diego Timing Association. According to Davis's " 'As Bad as the H-Bomb,' " an article from his collection

Dead Cities (2001), the Navy shut down that drag strip, thereby disenfranchising hundreds of kids. On Friday, August 19, up and down El Cajon Boulevard, a street pulsing with drive-in restaurants, youngsters received a handbill announcing a "mass protest meeting" the next night at El Cajon Boulevard and Cherokee Avenue, between City Heights and Normal Heights. The organizers of the protest were mad at the "criminalization of their sport," to quote Davis. The next evening, nearly 3000 teenagers and young adults "blocked off a long section of El Cajon Boulevard and were cheering on racers in a miscellany of vintage hotrods and customized family sedans." The police arrived and battled those assembled

for three hours, "wielding batons, lobbing tear gas, and driving their patrol cars onto the sidewalks...to disperse the crowd." "Eventually 116 'demonstrators,' including 36 juveniles, were hauled away in paddy wagons." Though Davis wasn't at the riot — "I was too young to drive and was curfewed at home" that night — many of his buddies were there. As participants and supporters, Davis recalls, they felt it was the " 'bitchinest' event of our lifetimes."

Davis contends that the youth rebellion of the '60s — yes, the counterculture started in San Diego with the El Cajon Boulevard drag-strip riot of 1960. "I'm trying to argue," he tells me, "against people who are doing histories of the '60s. They're looking at far too much

from the top down, the media-appointed celebrities, old-guard leadership, the rich kids who became the Weathermen. They're not looking at the rank-and-file kids. They're not seeing how the '60s were cultivated and made possible by this massive antiauthoritarian youth rebellion that began in the late '50s. First of all, by first-generation young black Northerners. Then amongst white kids of all kinds. My kind of pre-politics was with this stuff drinking, racing cars, breaking windows, stealing cars. It wasn't just trivial. There was a deeper and very serious aspiration."

It didn't take long for the teenage Davis to spiral away from Bostonia. On weekends he visited a Communist bookstore in Tijuana and was

banned in the United States were for sale across the border. He also hung out at Wahrenbrock's bookstore, where he met writers and beatniks. The store carried a line of new literature from New Directions books: "We could sit in the basement for hours and read, and they wouldn't hassle us." Then the civil rights movement landed in San Diego during the 1950s, because this city, Davis says, "was a Southern city in every sense." Jim Miller, in his section "Just Another Day in Paradise?" from Under the Perfect Sun, documents the racism of the time: African-American leaders complained about discrimination in access to businesses and in the labor movement. One black leader said that San Diego was "the worst place on the coast in discrimination practices," citing a higher unemployment rate locally among blacks than in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

impressed that books

In 1962, Davis began picketing with the Congress of Racial Equality every Friday at the all-white Bank of

America branch at Sixth and Broadway. This bitter protest, which featured numerous arrests, was condemned by "Mayor [Frank] Curran, members of the city council, judges, and police," according to Miller. Eventually, Bank of America gave in and hired African-American employees. Davis also recalls the excitement of Freedom Summer, when civil rights workers registered black voters throughout the South. He notes that San Diego CORE members used to listen on a special telephone hookup to progress reports of the registration drive. "Nothing could have been more dramatic." Sadly, Freedom Summer culminated with the murders of three civil rights workers in Mississippi by the Ku Klux Klan.

Then, a blow — in 1962, Davis's father, who was an excellent golfer and bowler, had a massive heart attack and was hospitalized for a month. The effect was "catastrophic." Since insurance paid only 80 percent of the bill, Davis quit high school in his junior year and worked as a meat cutter to support





the family. Later that year he reenrolled as a continuation student and was in a class with kids who'd been expelled from high school or served time with the California Youth Authority.

Ultimately, Davis says, his antiauthoritarian adolescence was seeded neither by poverty nor by disadvantage. Despite his unsettled high school years, he won a scholarship to Reed College. Though Reed was "everything I hoped for," Davis notes, he "was out of there in two months." Academically, "I couldn't cut it; I felt like a country bumpkin, an idiot." The educational promise of Davis's early life had been hollowed out by his rebellion. He realized that he could, through his own penchant for reading and study, educate himself. "By the time I was 19," he says, "I was living in New York City." There, no longer a student, he joined Students for a Democratic Society and began organizing sitins and protests.

Two friends from Davis's youth — Brent Lawson and Skip Jensma — join us for dinner at El Cajon's Pernicano's. Inscribed on its green awning is "Since 1946," the year each of them was born. Lawson, a mechanical engineer with the county, is a big man

whose heart is easily moved. Skip Jensma, a clerk with the superior court, remains the most "hippie" of the group, his liberal values born in the '60s. Two years ago, Davis's Bostonian buddies organized a reunion the first get-together in 35 years. Among those who attended were Lawson and Jensma; the Fry brothers, Richard and Ron, whose father ran Fry's Hardware store; Don Bokovoy, an attorney in Escondido; and Darcie Whitacre. The peripatetic Davis wasn't able to make the first reunion, but he has, having returned to San Diego to live, made subsequent ones.

Lawson says that at such reunions, "You apologize for things you did that you think bothered the other person for years, but then he can't even remember it." In truth, Lawson was "especially choked up" to see his companions, several of whom remained in Southern California. He wonders why he "wasted 30 years" before he made contact. "I needed somebody to talk to so many times —" his voice trailing off with emo-

tion. The get-together was, for Lawson, "overwhelming," as was the long hiatus. After all, he had surfed, slept on the beach, gotten drunk in Tijuana, and raced cars with these guys, and then they had just vanished from his life. Jensma has more contented memories. Today's Second Street, with its "typical Taco Bell and Carl's Jr.," was once lined on both

sides with "pepper trees, walking paths, no sidewalks, and horse ranches. It was beautiful. It was a nice place to grow up. When we were little kids, especially during the summer, I would leave in the morning and, as long as I was home for dinner or by dark, everything was fine. We just took off." And Davis adds, "As long as you did your chores."



Jensma clearly remembers Davis's talents with science and reading. He was "always in a different place from the rest of us." When they were in fifth grade, Jensma says, Davis had his own home chemistry lab, with Bunsen burner, and he was doing sophisticated experiments. Politically, Jensma's and Lawson's parents were "very conservative"; they didn't talk about San Diego graft at the dinner table. Jensma says that Davis's parents had such discussions on occasion, particularly his father, who was "charismatic" and knew San Diego's most powerful men, having made meat deliveries to their restaurants and hotels. The Davises were "exceptional people. I never met anyone like them. I remained after Mike left" San Diego. Davis's mother had a lasting influence eral views about "the race issue, religion, equality came from

Davis and his girlfriend to meetings of the Congress of Racial Equality. "My parents didn't like me hanging around with him because he had such strong views at 16. He was way ahead of us." At those meetings, Lawson recalls stuffing envelopes and "being very quiet, listening. I was out of my element" because he, Davis, and Davis's girlfriend were the only white kids. Lawson also remembers that Davis was a "voracious reader." His room, in high school, was "wall-to-wall, floor-to-ceiling bookshelves, loaded with everything. Tolstoy and Marx." Davis read and "talked about the downtrodden, but he didn't try and convert us to anything." Isolated in El Cajon, Lawson knew little about the outside world, so Davis's untypical ideas fascinated him. The year was 1964, and they graduated from high school only to face the military draft. Almost immediately, Lawson got snagged for duty in Vietnam, and Jensma,

though he went to college, eventually quit and enlisted, then served in the war as well. Davis, of course, became eligible for the draft after his expulsion from Reed College. Called for his physical, he put up such a fight — telling the Army personnel that he belonged to several Communist groups — that they "threw me out of the induction center," deeming him "temporarily unsuitable" for the military.

Later, we're sitting in Davis's black Toyota Tundra truck. He tells me that most of those he grew up with "felt our lives were trapped, [felt we were] surrounded by people in a town that was politi-

cally, culturally, religiously intolerant, suffocating, and totally segregated." And yet, why was Davis so inclined to become a political renegade? Why weren't more of his buddies radicalized? "A lot of my friends," Davis says, clutching the steering wheel, "are more responsible than I am. They took greater responsibility for their families, their siblings, and people they loved." It's very "Thornton Wilder, the content of so much American experience." He admits to not being one of "those different souls who are trapped because they're responsible."

We talked about memoir then and the inherent pitfalls of telling our own stories. Davis dislikes memoir. He terms the form "a terrible genre," self-referential, self-serving, untrustworthy. He says he'll probably never put down his own peculiar journey, but he has thought a lot about "why a person such as myself, out of such an average background, ends up with the belief system I have, who leads the itinerant life that I have, who embraces the things that I do. It's not clear to me how certain predispositions to certain beliefs or lives exist." And yet, if Davis never writes his story, we'll never know how he got out of Bostonia more different than anyone he knew. ■

backpedal on his commitment to oppose further satanic suburbs. Hedgecock had claimed that "a yes vote on North City West is quite simply a sellout to L.A. developers." But this is precisely what now made political sense to Wilson, who was ready to venture out into the bigger political world. After Nixon's resignation, it was common knowledge that Reagan would run for the Republican nomination in 1976. Wilson wanted to move into the vacant governor's mansion and he needed the financial backing of mega-developers like the two firms proposing to build North City West: Pardee Construction (a subsidiary of Weyerhaeuser) and Irvine-based Baldwin Construction.

At the same time, both Wilson and SDI also needed the help of big corporate developers to save the faltering downtown redevelopment machine. Wilson had campaigned on the premise that the revitalization of downtown was the alternative to fiscally irresponsible and environmentally destructive growth on the periphery. In reality, political logic dictated a different relationship between center and edge. Even with the leverage of massive public subsidies, downtown renewal as envisioned by SDI demanded the resources and reputations of the very largest developers. These developers, in turn, were unwilling to commit to center-city projects unless they were unleashed in the more immediately profitable suburbs.

Thus a series of quid pro quos emerged: Ernest Hahn — a former associate of C. Arnholt Smith agreed to develop Horton Plaza, while Wilson supported Hahn's huge University City project. Pardee got Wilson's turncoat endorsement for North City West, and Pardee, accordingly, became involved in the redevelopment of the Marina. Pardee also hired Wilson's chief planning adviser, Mike Madigan. Development rights in supposedly protected zones of the north city were traded under the table for commitments to save downtown. Funds

Wilson, who had eagerly used federal funding to develop middle-class condominiums downtown, promised his new allies that he would leave the problem of affordable housing to be solved by the private sector. The city's role was confined to leasing or selling land at below-market values to residential and commercial developers — a policy that generated many conflicts of interest.

Wilson also pushed through an ordinance that provided for the unrestricted conversion of rental apartments to condominiums. Housing advocates interviewed by the *Los Angeles Times* were appalled by the Wilson regime's double standard:

originally earmarked for open-space preservation were diverted to finance the downtown convention center. At the same time,

"He's for subsidies for downtown. But when you talk of subsidies for people who need them — people who are poor — that's a







different ballgame." Indeed, ignoring the poor became a hallmark of the meaner-leaner Wilson administration after 1976. Questioned by the Los Angeles Times in 1982 about his administration's neglect of Southeast San Diego, Wilson shrugged his shoulders and said, "That is not something that you can simply wave a wand and create."

As a result, downtown was gradually gentrified while affluent subdivisions spread across coastal mesas. Environmental planning remained holy dogma in San Diego, but open space continued to be devoured by development and traf-

fic congestion rapidly approached the threshold of L.A.-style gridlock. Kevin Lynch, the famed urban designer who studied San Diego in 1974, was particularly shocked by the city's neglect of traditional bluecollar neighborhoods like North Park. He enumerated the symptoms: "The dangerous traffic, the heavy parking, the lack of parks, the threat of uncontrolled apartment growth, the aircraft overhead, the poor walking conditions, the deteriorating commercial strips" and, he might have added a little later, the cataclysmic bisection of North Park by the 805 Freeway.

But if "growth control" under Wilson failed to either stop the suburban juggernaut or address the condition of an older neighborhood like North Park, it did achieve the goals advocated by Fletcher, Luce, and other Wilson supporters of raising land values and channeling most new construction into the upscale market. Blue-collar San Diego — including the thousands of noncommissioned military families — was priced out of the new-home market while shoddily designed apartment construction ransacked older singlehome neighborhoods.

While stealthily opening the floodgates to these forces, Wilson was loudly trying to lock out the city's unions. Again, higher political logic dictated his moves. In 1976 — after battling local firefighters he spearheaded the most antiunion initiative since the ban on street speaking in 1911: Proposition J, which not only outlawed public-employee strikes in the city of San Diego but also prohibited the rehiring of striking workers. The next year he tried to make a statewide version of Proposition J the bandwagon for his gubernatorial campaign (and a precedent for his analo-

gous deployment of antiimmigrant Proposition 187 twenty years later). The image he was trying to market to Republican primary voters was that of the tough public executive who would now defend them against greedy workers and power-hungry union bosses, just as he had previously protected taxpayers from the spiraling costs of uncontrolled growth.

But Wilson's 1977 campaign was doomed from the beginning. In 1976, hoping that he might be nominated as President Ford's vice presidential running mate, he had campaigned for Ford

against Governor Reagan in the New Hampshire primary. Now the Reaganites were determined to crush him. It was not hard. With little name recognition outside San Diego, Wilson came in fourth with a miserable 9 percent of the statewide primary vote. The San Diego County vote was even more humiliating: he barely won third place. Yet in 1979, he easily secured a third term as mayor with a victory over former California Democratic Council president Sy Casady.

The object lesson was clear: Wilson might be a deity in his own City Hall but he was strictly a



nonentity to statewide and national Republican voters. The nonpartisan centrism that was so popular in city elections was a kiss of death in the highly ideological statewide primaries. Most of all, Reagan's "Kitchen Cabinet" remained the gatekeepers of Republican power in California, and if Wilson hoped for a career on a bigger stage, he needed to grovel at their feet and

win their forgiveness. This he set about doing with his usual button-down fastidiousness.

Locally, he continued his transformation into Pistol Pete, promising to "win the war on crime whatever the cost." (Years later in a public television interview, he would claim his crackdown on crime as his greatest single accomplishment in San Diego.) A few critics contested the coded racial politics of Wilson's unleashing of the police department, but it was a generally popular policy with middle-class voters. More important, it was an essential credential in running for higher office against such red-intooth-and-claw types like attorney general George Deukmejian.

The terms of his reprieve were eventually revealed by Reagan henchman Lyn Nofziger in an article widely reprinted in summer 1982. In essence, Wilson had been ordered to divert his ambitions from the gubernatorial primary — where he was again hapless competition for better-financed Republicans like Lieutenant Governor Mike Curb or Deukmejian — to the senate race against Jerry Brown. Nofziger warned Wilson in so many words that he was still largely regarded as a wimp and that his only hope of redemption was to chew Brown to pieces. This was his road to Canossa. President-elect Reagan, as a symbol of his pardon, had earlier appointed him head of a task force on urban strategies.

Wilson, who barely survived the bitter primary battle with incumbent

senator Hayakawa and liberal Republican Pete Mc-Closkey, had a slightly easier time with Jerry Brown, still in hot water with voters for his mishandling of the Jarvis tax rebellion and Proposition 13. Wilson's positions — carefully calibrated to win the hearts of big developers and agribusiness — horrified many of his old-time San Diego supporters. He was now a passionate advocate of, for example, the proposed Peripheral Canal, which would divert more water for Southern California suburbs while inflicting incalculable damage on the ecosystems of Sacramento-San Joaquin delta. Equally, he was a heavily subsidized mouthpiece for the enemies of the farm workers' movement. "California cannot afford," he thundered, "a U.S. senator who takes his farm policy from Cesar Chavez, his social policy from Tom Hayden and his foreign policy from Jane Fonda."

So Wilson took his farm policy from the growers, his social policy from the prison guards, and his foreign policy from the White House. As official Reagan urban spokesman, Wilson advertised a bowdlerized version of his accomplishments in San Diego. Growth control and regional planning were not on the Reagan agenda, so Wilson emphasized their opposites: "The trick toward the saving of American cities is to encourage and stimulate private sector's reinvestment in them. And you don't do that by overtaxing the investor or overregulating him or making it difficult for him to employ people." He also proposed withholding federal funds from cities with rental control ordinances: "We're not going to spend money in a city that is inflicting upon itself a disease." The former white hope of the Sierra Club was now just another Southern Cali-

fornia reactionary.

fter this year's MTV Video Music Awards, few people were likely to jump into conversation about who won the Viewer's Choice Award or that for Video of the Year. Their talent is enough reason to listen to their music. The lyrics are powerful and much more profound than anything released by Spears or Aguilera, and the vocal talents are incomparable. ritney Spears and Natalie Portman may have kicked off 2003 together, but they represent opposite extremes on the hipness scale in American pop culture. When I first saw the pair pictured together at their joint New Year's Eve party, the disparity was obvious. The bleached blonde, dressed in a sleeveless tuxedo

shirt, appeared like she was Portman's waiter rather than her famous peer. Spears flexed her arm in the photo and feigned a hip-hop dance move, but she kept her eye on the camera to make sure it was capturing her fake smile. Portman didn't need to please; with her head cocked to the side, she laughed.

Both claim to be "not a girl, not yet a woman" and reign their respective entertainment fields. But singing has little to do with Spears's title. Instead, her coolness stems from feeding the public what it wants: skin and scandal. As her 15 minutes of fame tick away, these attempts become more obvious and frequent. Mimicking her pop counterparts, Mandy Moore and Christina Aguilera, she has dyed her hair brown and proclaimed her adulthood by admitting she lost her virginity. Yet, she has to emphasize that she's hip — that she's not afraid to be "dirty" too with a provocative photo spread in W magazine.

While Spears is trying to force her cool status moment by moment, trend by trend, Portman wields a more powerful approach: subtlety. She wore a hooded sweatshirt and faded jeans to the MTV Movie Awards; people remembered her smile. She attended Harvard University and downplays her star status by using her real last name; people respected her modesty and intelligence. Portman remains hip because she doesn't try to entice males with skimpy clothing or be a role model for girls by verbalizing her independence. Her film roles say enough. Spears may be scrambling to keep up with the public's fluctuating appetite, but Portman seems to operate through surprise. Many people do not immediately realize that she is cool but become enthralled later when they discover her talent by themselves.

Ultimately, the hippest public figures realize that they don't need to validate or publicize their status for people to know that they are alive. Instead, they are "hip" through features that can't be bought or beautified: intelligence, confidence, and talent.

thing about women, as that would require growth, and they are arrested in a state of blame, lacking the ability to take responsibility for their actions. They are so busy whining and reacting to the drama in their relationships that they are incapable of seeing their contribution to their unhappy relationships.

To describe Sing Yu as a "possibilities junkie" is to nail him accurately, and I have met his ilk. He has one foot in, and one foot out of, several relationships, juggling all, rather than taking the radical step of choosing one woman. The jury's still out on Jarrod, but in their relationships with women, both Robert and Sing Yu are childlike in their passivity. It is sadly typical of some otherwise intelligent men to exercise more care in choosing a car than a wife or girlfriend. When Fred mentions dismissively that it is women who buy all the self-help books, I guess he is endorsing that definition of insanity which is "doing the same thing over and over again, expecting a different result."

It was cowardly of Fred to omit information about his own history with women in this article. To buttress his hypothesis that women cannot be satisfied, why wasn't he brave enough to share his relationship history? Instead, he hides behind the trousers of his subjects, letting the reader know he sees the folly in their relationships, while revealing nothing about his own. Though clueless about women, Fred appears smart enough to know he is too close to his own experience not to unwittingly expose his inadequacies if he shared his story.

Women are characterized as calculating because they are often more discerning than men in choosing a mate. I say, take a lesson, boys. Beware of chemistry and pay more attention to whether a woman is honorable, smart (fill in your own top-ten attributes) before you move in with or marry her. Let some time pass before you decide whether she is worthy of you. The concept that, after a relationship breaks up, "men replace, women reflect," is too often true. How many newly divorced men do you know who wait a while before they're hooked up again? If a man cannot pause and assess what went on in his previous relationship before grabbing the next woman who's handy, he will learn nothing and will deserve what he gets.

It is my belief that love can be exhilarating or treacherous, depending on whether you enter into it mindfully. There is a certain abandonment required when love is fully satisfying, but one can savor it as much, if not more, when one waits until it is safe to let go.

Nonetheless, it appears this entire Bauder article would have been just as effective without ever once mentioning our family.

The opening paragraph of the article promises to tell the story of "how San Diego got the chauvinistic sobriquet 'America's Finest City'? It's a sordid story justifiably sullying San Diego, its government and establish-



ment, as well as the Nixon administration." Mr. Bauder then moves immediately from that statement to gratuitous derogatory remarks about my brother, John Alessio, labeling him a "bookmaker," which he never was. Before he died in 1999, my brother John spoke three languages, had been vice president of a Tijuana bank, president and general manager of Caliente Race Track, and president of the Alessio Corporation — a Southern California real estate and development firm. And while Mr. Bauder was discussing Alessio family personal business, how is it that he never remembered any of the good we did for the San Diego community building over ten schools out of our own pockets for the poverty-stricken children of Tijuana, throwing a free annual Christmas party (including dozens of Hollywood and show business big-name performers at our own expense) for the many name but three.

Later in the same piece, Mr. Bauder seemed again to go out of his way to take more "cheap shots" at the Alessio family. Yes, it's true my brother John and I went to jail in the '70s for mistakes we admitted to but in truth never did. In the best interests of our collective families, we made a pact with public servants who wanted to launch careers into higher office. We then paid our debt to society and have since moved on with our lives. But the Reader doesn't seem satisfied with that. Is this the only way your publication can continue to line its pockets from the sale of plastic surgery and liposuction advertising — kicking around people in their 80s who came to this city as children of poverty right after WWI and through hard work made their way up from shoeshine boys and 100-hour weeks — all in pursuit of the American dream?

The sort of "tabloid" reporting ("Sleaze Saga") undermines whatever journalistic integrity and credibility the Reader and Mr. Bauder have built up with the San

It is, as I like to say, helpful to read the column all the way through. As hinted in the column's headline, "Our Annual Pigskin Preview," the column deals with the 2003 NFL season. I then make predictions how each NFL team will do.

Let's read that again. "I then make predictions how each NFL team will do." Hint number two. Note the sidebar, "The Vegas Line," that appears in the column. The sidebar contains various betting odds, in this case, concerning NFL teams. A similar betting line appears in every column I've written for the past 13 years.

Let's combine the two together. And baste.

I am predicting how a given team will finish, period. I don't care, and anyone who lays a bet doesn't care, if the NFL, in total, barring ties and acts of God, must wind up with 256 wins and 256 losses at the end of its regular season. The only thing that counts, in this specific case, the case that I'm writing about, is if each team's record adds up to 16, the number of games each team must play during the season.

Here's the deal, Brian. The column is my best judgment on how I think each team will finish. That's it. That's why total wins and losses don't add up to 256 on each side. They were never meant to add up. I am not writing about the NFL's total wins and losses: that's irrelevant to the column and that's already known. My predictions are based solely on my assessment of the likely performance of individual teams.

The fact that if you took all my recommendations and walked into a sports book and put your money down on each team exactly as I predicted and then discovered that it was mathematically impossible for you to win all your bets only means you're an idiot. No one able to count money bets on all 32 NFL teams. People bet on the teams they know best, usually 4, 5, 6, 8 teams, 15 teams. And when you're dealing with 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, 15 teams, the issue of symmetrical wins and losses does not





led dogs wear booties, it's true.
So do sniffer dogs at certain
disasters. (The World Trade
Center was one.) But for most dogs,
footwear will be a new concept, the
website of Ruff Wear, makers of Bark'n
Boots, admits.

Ruff Wear has been supplying REI San Diego with "all-terrain paw protection" and other outdoor dog gear for about three years, says Kara Bitel, the store manager. "Booties are important if you're going to bring your dog hiking on a hot, hard surface," says Bitel, who often hikes with her mixed breed, Jamba. "For instance, granite. That's what you'll find in a lot of the eastern Sierras, as well as Yosemite."

LOCAL EVENTS

Bitel hikes near Yosemite, in the Immigrant Wilderness, where dogs are allowed. "If

you hike with your dog even for a short while, the pads and paws can get really messed up."

Ruff Wear's booties come in red, royal blue, and black; they sell for \$38 a set. Ruff Wear ("For Dogs on the Go") also makes a dog overcoat. So does Outward Hound, an Internet company that sells a full line of pet travel gear, including carriers — and its coat comes with a removable hood.

Whatever happened to the three-dog night? Dogs used to keep the humans warm. Now humans keep the dogs warm — by buying them apparel and other pricey equipment. A dog travel bed, for example. "When I camp with Jamba, if I don't have something for her to lie down on, she gets super cold," says Bitel. The beds sell at REI for \$20 to \$100. "They stuff inside a sack."

The beds are made also to fit compactly inside a tent. That's not necessarily the human's tent. There is such a thing as a dog tent now — yes, with a dog door. (Ruff Wear's Mutt Hutt is \$98.)

Insane? Makers and sellers of dog gear say not if you want your dog to be safe while traveling to places and engaging in activities for which nature didn't equip them.

REI's event specialist Todd Smith has just returned from ten days of backpacking with his 12-week-old pug, Gustav. It's Smith who will conduct the dog-gear "clinic" at REI this week. Has Smith bought Gustav anything to wear yet? "I've bought him a few things," says Smith. "I'm going to get him a little pack and some other things. He'll be at the clinic. I'm going to bring him

and dress him up."

By "pack" Smith means a backpack. (They're made by Granite Gear and Kelty, as well as Ruff Wear.) So Gustav can carry his own food and water, burro-style. But since dogs should carry only 25 to 30 percent of their weight, Gustav, even when full grown, won't be schlepping much. In any case, when he gets to the campsite, his grub can be served to him in collapsible dog bowls (\$12.95 to \$19.95). They are made by a variety of companies, although Ruff Wear's founder, owner, and head product developer, Patrick Kruse, is the widely acknowledged inventor.

"That's the bowl that started it all," says David Madden, Ruff Wear's marketing manager, by phone from company headquarters in Bend, Oregon. "Patrick brought it to a trade show in 1994, where it was picked up by L.L. Bean." At the time, Kruse's main business was making kayak paddles. It didn't take him long to

figure out that there are millions more dog owners than kayakers.

But Ruff Wear hasn't left water sports too far behind. "A really popular activity is kayaking with your dog," says REI's Smith. "That's especially if you have dual seating. You can put the dog in back. Or if it's a small dog, you can put him in the single seat with you." Dogs are also going sailing, power-boating, and rafting; and in an emergency, the dog paddle will take even a water dog only so far. Enter, then, the canine life jacket. Ruff Wear's Float Coats (\$49.95 to \$69.95) are its biggest seller in the summertime, says Madden.

The leading cause of sled-dog retirement is cataracts, says the Doggles website. Doggles — "protective eyewear for dogs" — are made by Midknight Creations of Jackson, California. Ruff Wear used to carry Doggles but doesn't anymore. "We're very interested in safety, so when we heard about the Doggles, we sold them

on our site," says Madden. "We got in on the front end when they were a small company and didn't have great distribution. And I think we helped them get a lot of good exposure, but they've since expanded into other distribution channels. You can find them just about anywhere."

Are Doggles sold at REI? No, says Bitel, but she has seen them at Muttropolis in Solana Beach. And Doggles says they can be found (for \$24.95) in a dozen other places here, including Dexter's Deli in Del Mar, Wag'n Tails in Coronado, and Phyllis Sweeney's Encouragement Factory & Gallery in Fallbrook.







### Roam-O-Rama

#### A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond • By Jerry Schad

Millions of years of tectonic uplift, weathering, and erosion created the maze of monzogranite boulders in the Wonderland of Rocks section of Joshua Tree National Park. Wherever you look in this region, your mind is dazzled by oversized loaf-like stacks of rocks, by boulders arranged in columns and spires, or by huge granite domes.

To see the best of it, you can try the 5.7-mile, one-way hiking traverse across the Wonderland of Rocks known by some as the



"Wonderland Connection." Make no mistake, this is no easy stroll. At times you'll feel like an ant trying to negotiate a fiercely jumbled landscape. You must be adept at both boulder hopping and scrambling across tilted rock surfaces. Much of the travel involves meticulously lowering yourself downward over angular boulders — not recommended for the faint of heart. Having a topographic map (available at the park's visitors' center) and map-reading skills is an excellent idea!

You begin at the Wonderland back-country board (kiosk) on the north side of Park Boulevard (a.k.a. Quail Springs Road), 1.1 miles southeast of the town of Joshua Tree. This is 0.7 mile east of Quail Springs Picnic Area and 2.3 miles northwest of Hidden Valley Campground. You'll end at the Indian Cove camp/picnic area, west and south of the town of Twentynine Palms.

From the Wonderland backcountry board, follow the Boy Scout trail (a dirt road) 1.4 miles north across sandy flats dotted with Joshua trees to the Willow Hole Trail, intersecting on the right. Follow the Willow Hole Trail northeast to where it enters a dry wash, then continue downhill in the wash. The wash soon becomes a canyon bottom flanked by stacks of boulders. At 3.5 miles you arrive at Willow Hole — some large pools flanked by a screen of willows.

Following a beaten-down path, you then work your way through the willows on the right, over a low ridge, and across a gap between two rock piles. Follow the narrow canyon bottom below, which will carry water draining from the pools at Willow Hole once the winter rains come. The remaining travel is entirely downhill, but progress is soon impeded as you negotiate a canyon section clogged with boulders.

At 0.7 mile beyond Willow Hole, a

north-flowing tributary joins on the right. Stay in the main canyon as it veers north and descends sharply for 0.3 mile to join Rattlesnake Canyon. Exercise care while descending this hazardous stretch.

Once you reach Rattlesnake Canyon, only a bit more than a mile of hiking remains. The going is easy for a while as you follow the sandy wash downhill (northeast). Some cottonwood trees brighten the otherwise desolate scene of sand and soaring stone walls. As the canyon bends left for a final descent to the flats of Indian Cove below, you face more episodes of serious scrambling. Keeping to the left-side canyon wall, you work your way around a slotlike canyon worn in the rock. Down in the bottom of the slot are potholes worn by the abrasive action of flash flooding. Only a bit more scrambling and a short walk down the canyon's sandy wash takes you to the end of the hike — the picnic area at Indian





#### American Expressionism: Art and Social Change, 1920–1950

FROM THE DUST JACKET: From the 1920s until the end of World War II, a distinctly American form of Expressionism evolved in the United States. This was an art distinct from Regionalism, the now better known style of the period. Unlike the Regionalists, Expressionist artists were often outsiders to what was then the American mainstream. Many were the children of turn-ofthe century immigrants from

Eastern Europe (William Gropper, Ben Shahn, Harry Sternberg, Jack Levine, Philip Guston), Southern Europe (Louis Guglielmi, Theodore Hios, Rico Lebrun), or Asia (Yasuo Kuniyoshi); many were African-American (Jacob Lawrence, Hale Woodruff, Charles White). But whatever their background, all of these men and women brought a new spirit of idealism to American art.

Many of the Expressionists had grown up in the urban ghettoes of the East Coast or Chicago, and as a result they were deeply concerned with the social problems of poverty and the difficult lives of working people. Their social consciousness only grew during the Great Depression. Some held militant Marxist views, and most were active in populist and left-wing causes. Even those who were not, however, tended to be sympathetic to the labor movement and to the problems of working people in hard times, and their art reflected this point of view. Although they did not share a coherent style, most made use of unconventional color systems and deliberate distortions of form as a way to express personal and social concerns. Thus, their art is best understood as a form of Expressionism firmly rooted in American experience rather than one based on European models.

During the Great Depression and up until the beginning of World War II, the American Expressionists received considerable support from the fine arts programs of the Works Progress Administration (WPA), the historic government agency founded by the Roosevelt administration. After the war, however, a new — and apolitical — movement, Abstract Expressionism, quickly displaced the topical expressionism that had preceded it. Author Bram Dijkstra argues that the new movement was deliberately fostered by conservative government and corporate interests as a way of suppressing the socially active idealism that had flourished during the Depression. In this new climate of opinion, the representational work of the Expressionists was ridiculed by powerful critics, savagely denigrated, and wrongly linked to Regionalism, Socialist Realism, and even the art of Hitler's Third Reich. Ultimately, it was dropped from serious discussions of American art.

American Expressionism brings to light the work of a group of men and women whose art has for too long remained in obscurity. Dijkstra's analysis will give readers a new perspective on the remarkable achievement of American artists of the 1920s and '30s, and it will change our understanding of this history and development of 20th-century American art.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR: A cultural historian and professor emeritus of comparative literature at the University of California at San Diego, Bram Dijkstra has published numerous books, including Cubism, Stieglitz and the Early Poetry of William Carlos Williams (1969); Idols of Perversity: Fantasies of Feminine Evil in Fin-de-Siècle Culture (1986); Georgia O'Keefe and the Eros of Place (1998); and Evil Sisters: The Threat of Female Sexuality and the Cult of Manhood (1996). He lives in Del Mar.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR: Bram Dijkstra was born Abraham Jan Dijkstra in 1938 in Indonesia. His father was an engineer. His parents, he said, on the day that we talked, "were on both sides from a colonial family, and they had been in Indonesia for three generations."

When Bram was two, he was taken to Holland. He explained. "Colonials would have furloughs back to the home country. My mother and my sisters and I had just gone to Holland when the war broke out. At that point my family was separated. My father lived in Indonesia, and he ultimately was put in a Japanese concentration camp, and although he survived it, he didn't really survive it for very long. He died pretty soon after the war."

"Those were terrible camps."

"Yes. People aren't as aware of them as they are of the German camps, but just in general terms they were almost as awful. There were no official extermination policies, but the Japanese couldn't care less whether someone lived or died."

Professor Dijkstra remained in Holland during World War II. "I experienced a number of bombings. It wasn't a peaceful time. There was a terrible famine winter in 1944–'45. The Germans plundered the country to supply their people and their armies. Holland went through a period of true famine where essentially there was virtually no food to be had.

"After the war my father came back to Holland, but then

we all went back to Indonesia just in time for the freedom movement in Indonesia. My family left in 1949. The Dutch were kicked out, appropriately so, I suppose. From 1949 on I lived in Holland and got my education there. I was a terrible student.

"I would have thought you would have been rather wild." "That is true. I got kicked out of a number of schools. Ultimately, I guess I felt that Holland was too small, too narrow a country to contain me. I got very interested in the United States. I was reading comic books all the time. American soldiers, who came through Holland after the war, left all these comic books and pop magazines. I got tremendously interested in jazz. So when I was 18 I decided that I should go to the United States. I applied for admission at Ohio State University.'

"Why Ohio State?"

"Because, during my later teens I decided that I wanted to become a journalist, and in Europe and Holland there were no journalism schools as such. So I thought that a way to combine things would be to go to the States and to go to journalism school. I went to the U.S. Information Service in the Hague and asked, 'Where should I go?' And they said, 'Ohio State.' In the late 1950s and early 1960s, Ohio State was really a good journalism school.'

'And a great football school."

"And, of course, a great football school. I didn't understand anything about football. I barely understand anything

At Ohio State, Professor Dijkstra initially found himself "a little bored" doing journalism. Then he found himself involved in a survey. He explained. "This was the time of *Sput*nik and Why Johnny Can't Read and all that. I did a survey of reading habits of the American college students, using Ohio State students as my subjects. I wrote a big article about that for the student newspaper, The Lantern. They published it, and it created a sensation because the editor sent it around the

country. There were articles about it in the New York Times and the Atlantic Monthly and in Saturday Review. So it created quite a bit of scandal because American students weren't reading that well. I had questions like 'Who wrote Moby Dick? And the answer would be, 'Shakespeare.'

The professor received his B.A. and M.A. from Ohio State, the latter in 1962. He was awarded a Ph.D. in English from the University of California at Berkeley. How he came to UCSD, he said, was through the old boys network. "The same people who had been my teachers at Ohio State, by the time I was getting ready to get my Ph.D., had migrated to UCSD.

When did you fall in love with painting?"

"I've always been in love with painting, really. I trace it back to my mother's house because she had paintings on the walls, very conventional paintings, but good ones. And I remember as a kid, there's nothing quite like when you're ill and you have to stay home — this is before the era of television, obviously. So you have nothing to do when you don't feel that well. So what you do is you start to look at these paintings. I started imagining myself in those paintings and fantasizing about them that way. I became more and more interested in art, and for a while I wanted to be a painter

"When I was at Ohio State I was debating whether to go into art history or literature. My first book, which was my dissertation, was Cubism, Stieglitz, and the Early Poetry of William Carlos Williams. This dealt with the effect of early modernism on American life and the way in which poets were influenced by the visual arts. That's essentially what I was interested in myself. I was doing drawings. Williams did drawings and wrote poetry. He ultimately decided that it would be easier, as a physician, to run around with a pencil rather than a canvas and all the other painting equipment.'

We talked then about Professor Dijkstra's newest book He opens with the story of how in December 1943, a Long Island junk dealer had bought a ton of bulk canvas for four cents per pound. The canvas bundles were at auction in a federal government warehouse. "On examining his haul more closely," Professor Dijkstra writes, "he had noticed that the scraps were marked with a variety of stamps: Works Progress Administration, New York Department of Health, and Federal Arts Project. Cutting open a bale or two, he discovered ... thousands of paintings torn from their stretchers." The junk dealer decided he'd try to double his money by selling his loot to a secondhand dealer, which, subsequently, he did. Henry Roberts, of the Roberts Book Company on Canal Street in lower Manhattan, reputedly paid the junkman \$55 for the canvases. Soon, writes

I asked how Professor Dijkstra learned the Roberts Book Company story.

By going back, he said, to original sources. "I've always believed in going back to these sources. They give you a much different sense of the history of American art than what you get from official histories. Because it's in the magazine, it's still living art, it's still living controversies. You get a sense of what the issues were.

"I was going through Art News and Art Digest. I came across these notices about what had happened at the Roberts (continued on page 92)



Book Company. I got an indication also that there had been something in *Time* and *Life*. I found the articles." As to the government's auction of the canvases, he said, "Frankly, it's not that different from the Nazi book burnings. These are, literally, 'painting burnings.' They weren't actually burned, but so many were thrown away. There were tens of thousands of works in the WPA warehouses. Very few have survived compared to what was being done at the time.

"I always felt the book should open with that. It is something that I was aware of for a number of years, and so I've been working, trying to figure out why these things happened. A dramatic change takes place in the early 1940s. During the 1930s, there is this focus on art as something by the people, as well as for the people. That's what's so interesting about the artists that I deal with. They didn't see themselves as somehow standing above the crowd. They, themselves, came mostly out of ghettos. They believed in the kind of populist qualities of American life.

"What fascinated me is why after the Second World War, there was such a dramatic change toward abstraction and why it happened so quickly because, between 1945 and 1947 — boom! — from being focused on representational art, American culture jumped onto abstraction in such a dramatic fashion.

'Certainly it was a generational change, but the irony is that these Expressionist painters around 1945 thought that they were riding high, and they were, in economic terms; a number of these painters were making three, four thousand dollars for their paint-



ings. Henry Mattson, the seascape painter, was considered top of the heap. His work was included in all the exhibitions; Frederick Wight put him in his Milestones of American Painting in Our Century. Mattson's paintings were selling for these huge sums, because \$3000, \$4000 in 1945 was a lot of money, like three or four hundred thousand now would be. By 1947, though, these Expressionist painters had been pushed out. The striking thing is that this changeover to abstraction crept up on these painters, and by 1947 they couldn't get their work into the shows anymore.

Before World War II, I said, painters in America were tending to paint the exterior world. After the war they began to paint the action of the interior world of the psyche. A generalization, I confessed, but that's what seems to have happened.

Professor Diikstra explained. There was the social Expressionism of the 1930s, and then toward the end of the 1930s, he said, "There's this element of surrealism that starts to enter into the work. This can be seen in a painter such as Louis Guglielmi or a number of the painters, even Harry Sternberg, who are focused on psychological issues as well. The social issues and the psychological issues start to mingle. A term that has been used for this is 'social surrealism.' And the social surrealism essentially opens up this world of the mind or

the psyche.

"Of course, there was this tremendous focus on Freud and Jung at the time. Freud gets overtaken by Jung around 1945–'50. But the same thing that creates the struggle between Freud and Jung also happens between the social surrealists and then the Abstract Expressionists. Because the social surrealists want to deal with the questions of the individual responding to the pressures of the world upon them and how that creates worlds of the mind. But then as the Jungian influence becomes stronger, there's much more focus on the collective psyche as being captured by the work of the artist. This element is translated very quickly and very easily into the artist having a privileged entry into the psyche. That was heavily encouraged by people like the critic Clement Greenberg.'

As I read Professor Dijkstra's book and gazed at the reproductions, I began to wonder about frames. For how long had paintings been

"That is a very complicated question. Framing of paintings certainly goes back to the Middle Ages. Let's say, an altar piece would be framed in a specific appropriate pattern. I've seen some frames with things from the 15th and 16th Century, where they still used wooden nails to keep things together. This whole issue of frames is related to the attitude people have toward art. In the 18th and 19th Century, you got these enormous frames, with which the bourgeois culture tries to emphasize, saying, 'This is important material, therefore, it has to have a big gold frame.' By the middle of the 19th Century, let's say by the 1870s, some of these hyperrealistic paintings would be surrounded by frames that were ten inches wide and weighed tons. Those frames then started to fall out of favor as Impressionism fell

out of favor. That's one of the fascinating things. We think that Impressionism was always in favor. But you weren't a modernist in the 1920s or '30s if you didn't have disdain for Impressionism. Nowadays, with Impressionism coming back, that whole element of design that is in the frame has also come back. So as a result, people build up these enormous frames against very small pictures, and the frame essentially announces itself as the wrapper. It's kind of like I have a Neiman Marcus wrapper, or a this or that wrapper. It is the indication that this is important. Of course, in the 19th Century, artists had to compete with each other in the most vicious way because these salon exhibitions were exhibitions at the Royal Academy and even the American National Academy. There'd be hundreds, if not thousands of paintings on the wall, and many of them were what they called 'skied' at the time, meaning that they were hung above the field of vision, actually, above proper sight. So they were hanging there, way above everybody else, and that's also where painting these enor-

mous paintings comes from. "It's fascinating. The thing is that in our art culture you're not supposed to deal with all the social elements that surround art. That's part of the modernist focus on art, and particularly the postwar focus of art, because that is supposed to be something that comes from the mind. Rather than a part of the world, right? And in a sense that is a reaction to the social concerns and the social involvement of the 1930s painters as well.

'I mention in my book that there appeared, as if on cue in 1942, a book by a guy named Frederic Taubes, and it's called You Don't Know What You Like: Finding the Good and Bad in Art. The book has as its thesis, 'You don't know what you like, let us tell you what you like, because you, the vulgar public out there, are just not equipped to understand art.

Of course, the people who are best equipped to tell you what to like are the dealers. That's the attitude that you find, not just among the American millionaires, but among the painters as well. Before the war it was more, 'I may not know much about art or about art history, but this is what I like and this is what I'm going to do.' Well, that starts to fall away after the war. Americans are essentially told. 'You're culturally vulgar, you're culturally incompetent, from now on we will do this. We will tell you what to like.' It's the ideal marketing tool."

This change, I said, must also have influenced the move of the art world center from Paris to New York.

"That's part of it. The American government was looking for a way to prove that it was culturally as important as it had become politically. Now it was carrying the big stick. It had become the superpower. From this point on, the culture needed to have its own art.'

However, as Professor Dijkstra notes in his book, the State Department was not pleased with art that depicted poor people. These paintings were not sent abroad.

About some of these paintings that depict the poor, Professor Dijkstra said, "One of the reactions I get most often is, 'How can you look at work like that, it's so grim. But I've been able to talk with a number of people who painted these works. A number of the artists who painted these works didn't see this as grim or ugly. They saw it as reality, and they saw the beauty in the faces of the people whom they painted even if they were in desperate straits."

I said that many of the paintings reproduced in Professor Diikstra's book reminded me of Van Gogh's The Potato "Exactly. Van Gogh always

believed that his work that he did in the Dutch countryside of peasants were some of his strongest works. People don't want to look at that. So, ironically, we keep looking at Van Gogh's bright Southern France works.

The government's attitude toward these paintings, said Professor Dijkstra, was "How dare you show the world that there is poverty in America. That America is not the world's greatest place.' And that's where abstraction comes in. The easiest thing for everybody to grab hold of was abstraction. The effect of it was that you could interpret it. The interpretation of art counted more than the art itself, in a sense. That's where that 'You don't know anything about art' comes in as well.

The move to abstraction, Professor Dijkstra said, was an expedient move for painters like Adolph Gottlieb and Jackson Pollock. Gottlieb, he writes, "needed the advent of Abstract Expressionism to escape mediocrity." Pollock, in the late 1930s, was painting figural canvases. Pollock became enamored of the murals of José Clemente Orozco. Pollock, Professor Dijkstra writes, "came to be heavily influenced by Orozco's tendency to paint the human figure in simple but intensely expressive and often rhythmically recurrent patterns of heavy, almost calligraphic line." These paintings, however, reveal Pollock's difficulties with the "technical demands of figuration." Professor Dijkstra concludes, writing, about Pollock, "Works such as this are clear evidence that his subsequent escape into 'pure' abstraction and ideological silence was not only a career-saving move for an artist in tune with the tendencies of his social environment, but also one dictated by his own emotional and ideological confusion and instability. To

emphasize this does not in any way diminish his lasting accomplishments as an Abstract Expressionist; but it does point to the fact that, even as a source of inspiration, he ultimately needed to react against, the work of the social expressionists had a tremendous influence on him.'

As for Pollock's last years, when he had become a great critical and commercial success, Professor Dijkstra said, "He essentially felt himself painting himself into a corner at the end. A lot of these artists felt that. The scary thing is that it's still going on, that in an odd way the artist becomes a parasite to the critic. Because the critics determine who the great artists are. Ironically, the critics need to find a justification for their own judgments, and they find the justification for their own judgments in what has to be protected for the investor."

"And in newness for newness' sake."

"Exactly. There is that whole notion that somehow newness counts more than anything like passion or

"All of that is so much a part of the postwar mentality, and it really is because, let's face it, if we are using our own judgment, what we're looking for is work that has meaning, work that speaks to us in a very direct fashion, but speaks to us emotionally, that speaks to us with passion. There are many elements involved in the passion that we have for art and the passions that art brings out in us. The scary thing about the postwar mentality — it's fallen apart now, but it's still to a large extent there — is that it is really based on this 'let us tell you what you like.'

Clement Greenberg (1909-1994) was editor of Partisan Review and art critic for the Nation and an early and important champion of Abstract Expressionism. "How," I asked Professor Dijkstra, "did Clement Greenberg turn himself into the Edmund

Wilson of the art world?"

"It was thrust upon him with the article that I cite, 'Avant-Garde and Kitsch,' published in 1939 in Partisan Review and one of his first published articles. He made this extraordinary statement that essentially there was this umbilical cord of gold between the artist and the ruling class. He said, 'Let's just face up to that and stop acting as if the artist has something to say to the people or for the people, because essentially the artist is a lackey of the ruling class.' He took that as positive because he figured that the ruling class also had control over the intellect. So we have this focus on a kind of higher spiritual quality in art, a higher spiritual meaning to art that abstraction presumably represented. The average person simply could not understand the subtleties of that work. That is already implied in these early articles of Greenberg. And so in the mid-1940s, when people were looking around for someone who could tell them what to like, Clement Greenberg was already there."

"Was Greenberg's 'Kitsch' article seminal for the culture in the way that Susan Sontag's 'On Camp' [published in 1964]

"Yes. 'The Avant Garde and Kitsch' is probably one of the most important articles about modern art or postwar art ever written. Certainly in the art world people are very much aware. Now, of course, there's a great deal of hostility to his dicta. But it's an amazing aspect of that postwar period, this general notion that we don't know what we like anymore, so please tell us what to like."

"Did the art critics, in the postwar period, visit artists' studios?"

'Yes, they would."

"It must have been like a royal visit.'

"Exactly, because they had this tremendously arrogant attitude — 'If I don't like it it's not art,' that kind of

thing. The role of the critic, then, changed so much. It's because the role of the critic vis-à-vis the collector changed as well. The collector started to dictate, in a sense, what needed to be important. Whether the critics were aware of it or not, they certainly knew that their livelihood depended on how the collectors responded to their judgment."

We talked about the Putnam sisters, Anne and Amy, San Diegans who donated part of their Old Masters collection to what eventually became the Timken Museum of Art.

'The Putnam sisters,' Professor Dijkstra said, "had a tremendous influence on how things turned out here in San Diego. Because they essentially got rid of Reginald Poland [director of San Diego's Fine Arts Gallery, now the San Diego Museum of Art]. And the thing is that Poland was a true connoisseur. Poland was a man who had independent judgment. He had developed a wonderful collection for the early San Diego Museum of Art. And then he was asked by one of the Putnam sisters, 'Do you feel that these works are great works of art?' He had his reservations, and he pointed out that a number of them were fakes. And that was the end of him.

"Ever since, the museum directors have not been able to use their own judgment, independently of the people who supply them with the wherewithal to run museums. So what has happened — not that this didn't happen to some extent before the war, but after the war — is that the world of art changed into a world of art investors, protecting their investments. I think that the Putnams are a wonderful example of the fact that you don't have to be conscious of that even in order to do that."

Fifty or 60 years ago, I said, few painters would have socialized with "people of quality." In those days, to invite a painter to dinner would have been like inviting your hairdresser to dinner.

"That's right. Before the war, but particularly in the 1930s, of course, artists didn't have to kowtow to anybody. When I talked with artists from the period, as I have over the past 20 years, the recurring refrain is 'We had no money, but it was a wonderful time. And it was a wonderful time because of the government. Because of the WPA. What your politics were didn't really matter."

"Have you seen most of the paintings that are in the

"I have seen a large proportion of them. My wife and I took the car, and we drove through the country. We stopped at all the various museums, in Omaha, Nebraska, Iowa. We asked to be shown the work that usually was in the vaults. We got to see a lot of work that hadn't been seen by anybody in America. Just some

of the most stunning works that had not been recognized as stunning work initially. The generation of art critics who were ideologically hostile to the work of the 1930s and the early 1940s taught their students that this was inferior work, that nobody really needs to take a second look at it."

I said that many of the reproductions in Professor Bram's book seemed technically exceptionally fine.

'Yes. These were artists who were technically very highly trained. And ironically the thing is that the artists who turned against their friends and went into the abstract realm were generally quite inferior in that particular realm. If you look, for example, at the 1930s work of people like Mark Rothko or Gottlieb, that work is inferior to the work of other artists of that group, Joseph Solman, for example. Joseph Solman was an excellent painter who refused to go into abstraction, who actually became more realistic after the war in reaction to the rise of the abstract.

"What happened is that their work was relegated to the areas that no serious art critic would look at. Unfortunately, what happened also, and this has to be said, is that a lot of inferior artists started to imitate their work, and that's where we get this motel art the motel modernism.


"What has happened is that the notion of 'you don't know anything about art' leaves so many people out that you have now whole generations of people who are saying, 'I don't know anything about art, so I'll allow myself to just indulge in whatever happens to be my favorite thing.' So there's no critical response there either. They are also being told what to like, and they're being told to like the worst kitsch possible by the people who produce that kitsch.

"So we have this world out there where everybody is kept from challenging themselves in the realm of art. If you start with the horrible art of these types of painters, if you looked at them for a while, and then you look at a really good Impressionist painting, you begin to say, 'Oh well, this is not nearly as good as the good Impressionist painting,' and so you've started already the process of comparison and judgment."

American Expressionism, the book, existed, said Professor Dijkstra, "before the exhibit and the exhibition was in Columbus until the 25th of August. We were there at the opening. It's terrific to see these paintings brought together for the first time. It's something where you see the work of painters who had similar kinds of inspiration, similar kinds of interests, and who also talked with each other to see how, out of that, they created so many individual styles. And yet each of their work has something very significant to say, has something to say that is political and humanist. That's so important in this art. It focuses on the importance, the significance, and the dignity of all humanity.

"As I point out in the book, it's so different from German Expressionism, where German Expressionists hated humanity.  $\bar{\text{T}}$ hey were puritans who felt that the world had fallen apart into its evil components, and so they were painting all the evils that they saw around them.

"That's also what happens in the Second World War with the rise of the new wealth and the new economic power of the war machine. There is this tremendous move to the right. There are some scary connections between that period and our contemporary period in that sense. What happens in the immediate post-World War II period that is so shocking is that all the pentup anti-Semitism during the war years comes out. Americans knew that the Jews were being persecuted; therefore, it was anti-American to be against the Jews in the same way. But that didn't mean that there was no anti-Semitism. Anti-Semitism was rife. Even with all the information that came through about the concentration camps, in the postwar years everybody started to feel free to lash into the Jews again because after all, America had won the war. And so in this postwar era — the period between, I would say, roughly, 1945 and 1955 anti-Semitism was out there



in the open. Nobody was hesitant about it. That's also why critics such as Clement Greenberg, and so on, start to move away and become hostile to the art of American Jews. Because these artists of the 1930s generation had been proud of their heritage, been proud of being Eastern European. They had seen their mothers work hard, slave to give them the opportunity to develop in the United States. They understood and they appreciated that. The thing with people like Greenberg is that they're a generation that comes from perhaps an older group of immigrants. It's like with Alfred Stieglitz. Already in the 1890s, Stieglitz was trying to deny his background, seeing himself as German rather

than as a German Jew. "This is what happens with the generation that you find coming to the fore in the postwar years. They want to deny their background. They want to assimilate as much as possible. And the best way of assimilating is to deny that having a Jewish background has anything to do with the art you produce.

"Paintings have always, since the Second World War, been placed in this privileged position as having no content. It's gauche if it were to have content."

"Not having content," I said, "they float above the culture in an iconic, Platonic way.

"And therefore," said Professor Dijkstra, "they were

untouchable. They were pure art versus all this art that was politically involved. I think that that's still how people respond. 'How dare you deal with this art in terms of the politics. Isn't art supposed to be above politics?' That kind of thing.

"Was it perhaps difficult for people to imagine visual artists as interested in politics? 'Artists, you know, they mix paint. Stretch canvases.'

"Perhaps. But the politics have been there forever. If you go back to the work of a Renaissance painter, you can see the influence of the Renaissance. But it's exactly that notion that you don't have to know anything about history to be a good critic in the art world. Today there are huge numbers of critics out there who treat each repetition of something that has already been done as being new simply because they don't know that there has already been a painting of that same thing. That's why there's this deadly loop of constant repetition of the avant-garde concept that vou find in contemporary art. Contemporary art is essentially doomed to repeat history, simply because they're not aware of history.'

As I looked at the paintings in American Expressionism, I found myself interested in the way that some of the artists placed the nude human figure in a situation where, normally, a person would be clothed. I asked why that was.

'I think it has to do with

that awareness that you find particularly in the 1930s of the link between eroticism and the outside world that somehow in our response to the erotic is influenced by the social structures we find ourselves in. It's almost as if the naked body comes to stand against the world. The naked body somehow makes a statement of what is organic versus a world that is an artificial structure. There is nothing that is more human than the naked body. That's why the people who are the most against humanism are always appalled by the human body.

Picasso's Demoiselles d'Avignon and Willem de Kooning's so-called "women series," the latter painted during the late 1940s, have always frightened me, I said. I asked Professor Dijkstra why he thought this was so.

"They're mean. They essentially declare women to be bestial and vicious, aggressive creatures. Ironically, that's exactly what Clement Greenberg encouraged. Every time de Kooning wanted to move away from these vicious women, Greenberg would say, 'Hey, get back to them.' They are aggressions upon women. They're slasher paintings."

Readers who visit museums and page through "art books" may well find that they recognize few of the names and almost none of the paintings discussed and displayed in Professor Dijkstra's newest book. I recognized very few. That for so many people these paintings will not be familiar was why Professor Dijkstra wrote this book, "I was driven," he said, "to write American Expressionism precisely because so very few people know about this art any more. I wrote the book in the hope readers would have the reaction you've described: why don't I know any of these artists, and why aren't they better known?'



# The Backhoe And the Needle

A good singer of art songs needs the eloquence of an actor.

JONATHAN SAVILLE

was looking forward to a stirring evening of Russian art songs, as I headed for the concert at Sherwood Auditorium in San Diego Opera's recital series. But it took only three notes from Georgian bass Paata Burchuladze

for me to realize, with a feeling of desperate entrapment, that I was not going to get it. Burchuladze has an enormous voice, but it is also a coarse, crass, unwieldy

voice, that might make an impression in a villainous role in the opera house but that confronted the variegations of mood and expression in this delicate repertoire like a backhoe trying to thread a needle.

The voice itself was unpleasant, at least to my ears. Burchuladze's technique exploited all the possible resonances of his anatomy — head, throat, and chest; but every voice has a timbre dictated by nature, and in his case I found the underlying timbre peculiarly obnoxious. This is a subjective judgment, which other listeners might legitimately disagree with. But no one listening carefully could fail to discern that the timbre was never allowed to change, to adopt different overtones and colors appropriate to changing intentions of the music being sung. At virtually all moments, in all the songs, the full battery was brought into play, as though to mow down every note with the same irresistible artillery.

There was one exception: a crooning baritonal sound the singer occasionally deployed as a roadside sign proclaiming "Tender Feeling." This actually was pretty: velvety and lyrical. But instead of being generated from an internal identification with the song's meaning, it was so obviously applied as an artificial device from without that it quickly lost all impact. Like the big bass bray it momentarily displaced, it too was perpetually the same: one tender feeling fits all circumstances. Nor did Burchuladze show himself capable of transforming the bray into the croon or vice versa, by a gradual swell or decrescendo with a concomitant modulation of

color (a blended tonal alteration that good singers know how to use with thrilling effect). We were either in the town of "Loud Declamation" or in that of "Tender Feeling," with no roadway between them.

As a consequence of these limitations, all the songs, whether by Tchaikovsky, Glinka, Arensky, or Rachmaninov, sounded vocally pretty much the same,

ultimately fusing into one thick, sodden mass. But even with a voice apparently incapable of nuance, Burchuladze might have given the songs life and individuality if he had demonstrated a talent for expressive textual interpretation. This is the most important attribute of a singer who is truly suitable to the art song (or the pop song, for that matter). A good singer of such music ought to be able to *speak* the text with poetic imaginativeness and dramatic power, giving expressive meaning to a minute alteration of timing, to the quality of a vowel, to the infinitesimal prolongation of a consonant. He needs the eloquence of an actor.

No such luck with Burchuladze, whose vocal acting was as monochromatic as his vocal production. He was indubitably aware of the overall emotional thrust of each song: bliss, grief, melancholy, smoldering anger, pathetic pleading. The 19th-century Russian art song, along with the texts on which it is based, is resolutely sentimental and melodramatic. But it and its poetry are at the same time great art forms, which make of sentimentality and melodrama true and deeply moving reflections of universal human experiences. To perceive the greatness, one must be made aware of the value of individual words, and of the way a turn of melody or change of harmony gives touching personal utterance to a feeling. Burchuladze seemed to have no consciousness at all of this level of detail, contenting himself with the largescale and the general.

And as to vowels and consonants, his diction

was so chewed and swallowed that there was no chance of their expressive potential being realized, even if the singer had cared about subtleties of meaning. One could hardly tell the difference between his stressed a's and his stressed o's, both of which were melted into an unnatural intermediate aw sound, like someone talking with his mouth full of water — the purpose evidently being to maintain the undifferentiated volume, resonance, and color of that huge, loud voice. (In his recorded performance as Prince Gremin in Eugene Onegin, Burchuladze refers to the heroine of Tchaikovsky's opera "Tawtiawnu.")

Lest one suppose that Russian singers — or (more narrowly) Russian basses — or (at the broadest) singers from the former Soviet Union — always sing the Russian art song like this, it would be useful to point out that Burchuladze is hardly typical. Just to confine my comments to currently active male singers who have excelled in the repertoire: Dmitri Hvorostovsky, who sings the same kind of songs, is riveting in his delivery, with a constant sense of authentic emotional involvement, and with a beautiful voice that he constantly varies in order to respond to the demands of text and music.

The wonderful Dmitri
Kharitonov has sung many of the Rachmaninov songs that were on Burchuladze's program, positioning each one in its own unique world of sound and expression, and dramatizing its content with a passion that always rings true. A case in point is Kharitonov's performance of "Sud'ba" ("Fate"), whose text is a long melodramatic screed against fate by Aleksei Nikolayevich Apukhtin. For Burchuladze, this was an occasion for mere bombast. It would never have occurred to him to treat the "stuk stuk stuk" of Fate knocking at the door as Kharitonov does. Burchuladze just followed the repetitions in the score in a routine fashion.

For Kharitonov, each reiteration of this dire refrain is treated differently, sometimes sung, sometimes spoken, sometimes with menace, sometimes with scorn, sometimes with disgust, creating a whole range of responses to the impersonal, inevitable, destructive interference in our lives of the cruel nature of existence. Rachmaninov's theatrical and declamatory setting, virtually a whole operatic *scena*, can sound inflated and even ridiculous, with its rather naïve references to the opening of Beethoven's C Minor Symphony. With Burchuladze, this song seemed nothing but an artistic embarrassment; but Kharitonov's performance is so focused, and



filled with such conviction, that "Sud'ba" reveals itself as the inspiration of a risk-taking genius, a composer capable of the largest of gestures and of making them count.

I did not much appreciate Sergej Lauren's performance as Otello at San Diego Opera last season, finding him neither vocally nor interpretively up to the role. But Larin's way with Tchaikovsky songs is incomparably more affecting than Burchuladze's heavyhanded approach. In his performance one hears the nuances of expression that Burchuladze ignores, along with a real intensity of emotion; and in the intimate context, Larin's voice is not taxed beyond its abilities, and can reveal its beauties.

Hvorostovky and Kharitonov are baritones; Larin is a tenor. But Vassily Savenko, whose mastery of the Russian art song is close to being unrivaled these days, is a bass, and his performances prove that a rich, rotund, dark bass voice is not at all incompatible with the refined and detailed expressiveness demanded by this music. If, after listening to Burchuladze barrel through Tchaikovsky's "I bless you, forests, valleys" and Glinka's "Doubt," you want to hear what these songs should really sound like, you owe it to yourself to acquire Savenko's several recitals on Hyperion. You will be amazed.

One minor point in the printed program is worth

pointing out. "Ikalos' li tebe, Natasha?" does not mean "Did you think of me, Natasha?" It means "Did you hiccup, Natasha?" The difference between these two translations is comparable to the difference between Burchuladze's performances of Russian art songs and those of Savenko, Hvorostovsky, Kharitonov, and Larin — not to speak of Boris Christoff, Pavel Lisitsian, Lina Mkrtchvan, Zara Doloukhanova, Inessa Galante, Jan DeGaetani, etc., etc.

The second half of Burchuladze's program was devoted to scenes from *Boris Godunov*, but I — along with a number of other disgruntled audience members — left before that could happen. Life is short.



# **Devilish Wit**

"When expectations of art stop changing, then a tradition sickens and begins to die or become paralyzed."

ne of the best books I've read recently is Clement Greenberg's Homemade Esthetics: Observations on Art and Taste, a collection of essays from the 1970s that formed the basis for seminars at Bennington College

where Greenberg — who loved a good fight, verbal or manual encouraged participants to challenge his ideas. His main argument is that taste is the same as judg-

ment and that both are embedded in life. To keep expanding and refining your taste, he says, you must expand and refine your sense of life. He explains how art, in any tradition, continues to advance. "It moves and lives by changing, by innovating. When expectations of art stop changing — which means, in effect, when surprise is no longer wanted from art or in art — then a tradition sickens and begins to die or become paralyzed.'

This was on my mind as I walked through the new exhibition at the Museum of Photographic Arts titled The Discerning Eye: Southern California Collects, a modest title for an ample show. It celebrates MoPA's 20th anniversary and the collectors who have played important roles in its growth. Although by the time the museum opened its doors in 1983 photography was long established as an art form, its value as fine art was still just growing. MoPA's collection now includes over 7000 images, increasing every day, and in 20 years it has nationally become a major player in acquisitions and exhibitions.

The Discerning Eye showcases work from major Southern California collections. It's the kind of anthology show I particularly like because it gathers and configures practically every period and style since the invention of the medium in 1839. And it's blessedly free of "issues." The mind can play over its contents and discover new angles of regard. It incidentally provides a condensed history of the medium from daguerreotype to video, but most of all it's a diorama of aesthetic

at first looks concerned exclusively with social realism: it includes Robert Capa's famous D-Day snapshot taken from the water among beachhead forces (the source for the opening scenes in Saving Private Ryan), Margaret Bourke-White's

shimmering image of an aircraft carrier (in San Diego, 1951), a tiny 1912 street scene of lower Broadway by Karl Strauss in which each figure is preceded by long splin-

ters of shadow, and W. Eugene Smith's ferocious 1972 picture from his Minamata series of a Japanese woman bathing her hideously deformed child, one of the many who suffered birth defects after industrial mercury deposits in the town of Minamata's water supply, in the 1950s, poisoned an entire generation and disfigured its progeny. But the selection also shows off the expansiveness and accommodations of taste, since the Garners also own two quasi-abstract pictures by the superb Italian artist Mario Giacomelli, one of a limed, light-blasted landscape, another of hanging backlit sheets that look like spectral marionettes.

Even familiar images stir unexpected recognitions, which is what good art should do. Examples of early photography from Joseph and Elaine Monsen's collection demonstrate how the double action of exposing reality on film (or glass or video or microchip) offers and covets. The first photographers were obsessed with the evidence of things seen. The statement made by pictures of ancient Egypt and Asia by people like the American J.B. Greene and the Englishman Francis Frith is not "I was there," but "It was there. (And ain't it grand!)" The act of reporting was at the same time an act of imaginative colonization. What once was rumor — like the golden cities and multiheaded creatures of early travel writers - now belonged to our understanding of what's really real. Remnants of any kind, like the Roman ruins in France photographed by Charles Negre in 1852, were the visual equivalent of fragments of lost ancient languages. The essential and essentially unappeasable appetite of photogra-

phy is to take in all of physical reality, in one exposure if possible, and you sense that excited desire in the early days of the medium.

Certain painter friends of mine, with an acidic mix of censure and admiration, refer to the supersized color photographs of Andreas Gursky and Thomas Struth as "the new painting." One precedent for this was Pictorials, the fine arts style that dominated late-19th and early-20th-century photography. (Even the high modernist Alfred Stieglitz started out as a pictorialist.) Michael and Jane Wilson's huge private collection is especially rich with pictorialist images by Julia Margaret Cameron, its most famous practitioner, and by the lesser-known Anne Brigman. It took photography less than 50 years to pass from Frith's and Greene's wide-angled exuberance to Pictorialism's plush, precious self-consciousness. Its "painterly" soft focus, melodramatic setups, and nebulous emotionalism fogged up the edges of physical reality. Pictorialism usually acts on viewers like medical photography: you're enraptured or repelled. I remember when I was ten lingering in the public library over medical-book

illustrations of deformities and wounds, and for better or worse I'm as cold now to the sweetened hugginess of Pictorialism as I was 20 years ago. It's a matter of taste.

Photography was a new way to memorialize, and its candor about the quick and the dead can still break us down. For months after the attacks on the World Trade Center, like so many others I could not stare at the photos and read the eulogies that appeared daily in the New York Times. The daguerreotype was invented the same year as paper-print photography, but because it was a one-time-only process — a chemically treated metal plate was exposed to an illuminated subject — it was soon made obsolete by the printmaking capabilities of photography. It combined photographic replication with the effects of engraving so that a person, landscape, or interior seemed incised, and it was the graveness of perfect likeness that made daguerreotype a compelling medium for memorializing the dead. The paralyzing image of a dead child from the Sandra and Stephen Dorror collection is a cool, terse statement of fact. Its very clarity loads it with ele-

giac sentiment. Another, on the same theme, is the living portrait of a doctor that's really a Hamlet-Yorick picture. The youngish professional smiles out at us from the chased iridescent surface that makes daguerreotype images seem to come and go, and on the table beside him are books and a skull.

The Discerning Eye is also a compact panoptic of classical subjects. Consider the nude. The Horst odalisque-with-fan from Peter C. Farrell's collection is unsettling because especially given the motif's classical pedigree — it's brashly arousing without being pornographic. The arousal comes from exquisite, fanatical attention to sensuous details — an erect nipple popping into the light, the woman's hand practically fondling her raised right hip, the fine leg hairs softly rising from flesh. She's alluring, certainly, but pure Tantalus. Compare that to Imogen Cunningham's 1968 *Phoenix Recumbent.* What we see of this nude is mostly loosened, wild, blond-streaked tresses. The body is a foreshortened afterthought following the hair up through the picture space. Nan Goldin's recent nude afloat in a polished-lacquer blue sea might as well be a siren or ocean

reds and yellows, human interventions and ecological depredations in desert lands of the American West. His Golden Gate picture is one of those my painter pals would call the new painting. Misrach renders nature's immensity as did early photographers like the American Carleton Watkins (also in this show), but the picture's vast scale and muffled high-key color give it a pressurized, stormy dread. Against a purple-dark sky, a string of dim lights runs north to south (the exposure time was 4:05-5:00 a.m. on March 20, 2000); we can see puny Alcatraz and, beyond it and the bridge, the Marin headlands. It may be the times we're in, but to my eye Misrach makes this popular and populist tourist site look abandoned, a wonder waiting to become a ruin. The Discerning Eye's cura-

tor, Carol McCusker, who has installed the show with a dazzling sense of correspondences, parallels, and precedents, had the devilish wit to set at the end of the exhibition, just waiting for us, a visual hand grenade, Tony Oursler's 1996 Let's Switch, a video assemblage composed of two small pajama-clad puppets with video-projected faces that practically wrap around their heads, who natter at each other so softly that we have to draw close to hear, and once we do, we hear gnomic revelations about, O help us all, relationships. "Desire is a mask for violence," says one. "I will no longer live in response to you," says the other. The manic charm of its silly, mock-portentous humor reminds us that photography refuses to shut up.





#### Beauty

Tina Landau took an intrepid risk for our been-there, done-that age. She wrote a play, with music, about enchantment. Constance, now an old crone, is a fairy. When King Bertrand dumped her, Constance cursed his daughter, Rose, into a coma. A thousand years of suitors fail to awake the "sleeping beauty." But James, a grad student, might. He may look past labels — and relentless Hollywood conditioning and see the actual Rose. But first he must wake up to himself and, it turns out, so must she. The La Jolla Playhouse's Beauty dazzles the eyes, if not always the ears. Ricardo Hernandez's elemental set combines smoky red curtains, giant briars, and moving flats that mesh in arresting stagescapes. And the leads, multitalented Jason Danieley and Kelli O'Hara, are outstanding (like their characters, their performances wake up). The script is a modernized fairy tale and a running commentary, interpreting itself as it moves along; the latter dis-enchants (as does the splatter of "what is beauty?" questions disrupting the climax). The show often captivates, and Landau's direction is imaginative throughout. But Landau-theauthor needs to take her play's advice. Instead of clogging it with ideas about itself and spoon-feeding the audience with significance, she should de-control and let Beauty wake up unfettered.


Beehive celebrates the women singers and "girl groups" of the 1960s. But if you caught only the first half hour, you'd swear something's amiss. The six talented performers parody every song and vocalist. As in melodrama they exaggerate gestures and tones, from Lesley Gore to the Supremes (who break up before our eyes) and Patti LaBelle (who, when she sold her heart to the "Junkman," was far more serious than this!). Directed by Paula Kalustian, the production abandons its aura of overkill-silly as

the '60s lose innocence. And the second half includes first-rate solos: especially Renae Mitchell as Aretha Franklin, Lisa Payton-Davis as Tina Turner, and Joy Yandell as Janis Joplin. The show captures some of the texture of the era. Jill K. Mesaros's costumes are a history lesson (the times weren't the only thing "a-changin'" back then; styles made 180-degree turns about every three years). Jasper Grant's four-piece band keeps the evening cruising. To the young, however, Nick Reid's set may require an ex-

planation. Those big black round things all over the place? Phonograph records. The ones with big holes in the center were 45s. And for the generation of the '60s, they were minted currency. **Worth a try.**



#### Love! Valour! Compassion!

When Diversionary first staged Terrence McNally's Tony Award-winner, in 1997, the show got caught in scheduling gridlock and had to close. To celebrate its tenth anniversary, Diversionary remounted Love! Valour!, Michelle Riel reprised her excellent, minimalist set, Chris Rynne his nuanced lighting, and the results rank among the company's most polished, funny, and moving efforts. In 1994, when the play premiered, McNally said, "I wanted to write about what it's like to be a gay man at this particular moment in our history, to tell everyone else who we are when they aren't around." Amid overwhelming evidence of uncertain futures the specter of AIDS is everpresent — McNally's people eat, drink, confess, gripe, and zing oneliners ("movies are for people," says Buzz, a musical comedy/opera buff, who have to eat popcorn while being entertained"). Tim Irving, who co-directed with Sean Murray, plays Buzz, the icon-drubber. If he weren't such a giving actor, this could be The Tim Irving Show (Mc-Nally wrote the part as a star vehicle for Nathan Lane). But Irving shares the stage with a talented cast and everyone — from Dan Gruber's Perry (for whom being a role model is "very stressful"), Manuel J. Fernandes' generous Gregory, and Dennis J. Scott's dual roles as the Manichean Jeckyll brothers (Mc-Nally italicizes themes), goodsouled James and evil-souled John.

#### **National Comedy Theatre**

ComedySportz changed its name, but its methods (and madness) remain the same. Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terrible Turks mangled defrocked Priests, while mums and dads yelled insults and grannies waved their handbags"). National Comedy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic director Gary Kramer says the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a "challenge match" against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit, rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledged failure, abundantly, then forgot it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian. Worth a try.



#### **Relatively Speaking**

Alan Ayckbourn's early comedy relies heavily — at times mind-bogglingly — on what isn't said. Greg wants to ask Ginny's parents for her hand in marriage. So he goes to an address on a matchbook. He meets Philip and Sheila, who aren't Ginny's folks (Philip's her former lover and employer). Because Greg assumes he's talking to Ginny's parents, miles of dramatic irony ensue. In a preview I saw, it took the North Coast Repertory Theatre a long time to get, and keep, rolling.

A languid first scene and slow set change didn't help. Also, in Speaking, Ayckbourn was much more concerned with crafting architecture — piling complications upon complications — than character. And a quality cast (including the ever-funny Brian Salmon and a seemingly innocent Susan Denaker as Philip and Sheila) wrestled with the script throughout. The production settled in, somewhat, when Marty Burnett's glorious set metamorphosed from Kansas to Oz. If you can accept Ayckbourn's avoidance of the obvious question without shouting, "Greg, don't you see?" — and if the cast comes together, the production might be worth a visit down the road. 



A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but San Diego Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, has written one of the few brilliant books (Improv) I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use.

Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art.'

Worth a try.

### Triple Espresso: A Highly Caffeinated Comedy



# "We are liquidating."

That's what an employee of the Vista Wherehouse said last week about the closing of his music store. In April there were 23 Wherehouse stores in San Diego County. Now there are 10. When Vista and National City close ("by the first or second week of December," said the employee), there will be 8 left.

Last month it was announced that Trans World Entertainment of Albany, New York, was purchasing the remaining 113 Wherehouse stores and that 35 of the "underperforming" outlets would be 86'd. Trans World operates 831 music retail stores outside of California, including the Coconuts and

Strawberries chains. One local Wherehouse employee at a different store said he heard that all Wherehouse outlets would eventually be closed.

John Sullivan, chief financial officer of Trans World Entertainment, did not respond to a request for comment.

But a manager at an independent local record store said he would not be surprised if all the Wherehouse stores would

eventually be snuffed.

"We figured out that based on the price Trans World paid for the Wherehouse chain, it would come out to \$290,000 per store. That barely covers the cost of the product in each

The eight remaining Wherehouse stores are in Del Mar, Hillcrest, El Cajon, Chula Vista, Imperial Beach, Plaza Bonita, Carlsbad, and Escondido.

The last time I saw Quasi was in San Francisco on the first night of the ill-advised war in Iraq. I considered skipping it. For one thing, war protesters had been shutting down city streets all day and there were thousands of arrests. For another, Quasi's main songwriter, Sam Coomes, doesn't seem like the kind of guy who'd cheer you up when you're feeling down. He's better known for singing pained, bitter breakup songs, which may or may not be about his ex-wife (who happens to be the only other member of the band) and exploring the futility of all things. (One song goes, 'You try to save a world that doesn't want to be saved.") But I went to the show and I've never seen Coomes look so together,

so...happy, almost. Finally, he had something to get depressed about other than his own life.

The new Quasi album, Hot Shit, is full of the same kind of spirit I saw that night. Many of the songs are explicitly political. (And I mean explicitly: One has an obscenityladen condemnation of members of the Bush administration and their allies.) The music, too, takes a different approach. The distorted keyboard sound that dominated Ouasi's sound in the past is absent. The songs still have Coomes's Tin Pan

Alley chord changes, but now pieces of Delta blues are creeping in from his side project the Blues Goblins. Janet Weiss (who also plays in Sleater-Kinney) plays in a more varied style than in the past, helping give the music an epic feel. The new songs aren't as catchy as the old ones, but Quasi is headed

in a direction that could be even more

A San Diegan for six months, New England transplant Matt Szlachetka strives for a bluesy alternative rock sound with his contrived musical entity, the Northstar Session.

The one-man band's style can be likened to that of Jack Johnson or John Mayer. With just an acoustic guitar and a not-so-discriminating choice of words and phrases. the Northstar Session stays true to the concept of the traditional soft-rock ballad. The guitar work is impressive. (His PR material says he graduated

from a "prestigious liberal arts college in New England," but he doesn't list the college.) Stripped-back melodies expose the rawness of the music, and the integration of mellow, acoustic-driven guitar riffs carries the slower ballads. Because of the all-acoustic format, there is a point where the songs begin to sound the same, which isn't good, considering there are only six tracks.

From "Bluenote" ("Let my soul breathe, set me free") to "Shining Through" ("follow your dreams / follow your heart...this passion flows through your veins and pours out for those around you whose passion flows through their veins and pours out just for you"), Szlachetka's vocals and lyrics are irritating. Though he's good with titles ("Music Under a Flight Path" is clever, though it suggests something a little louder - for instance, a metal band), maybe the guy just isn't good with words. Or

tones. Szlachetka's voice has a tendency to be a bit whiny at times and wears weak and thin by the album's end.

The final track, "Market for a Woman," is essentially a six-minute personal ad. Not a good way to finish things off.

They don't have quite the talent in the music area. Gregory Page is often here, but that's usually to sip coffee after his show at the Ould Sod a few doors down. The Biddy Bums are an excellent band that play here every Thursday. They do great acoustic pop songs and can be funny at times.

# **Mexican Heaven**

"Have you been to Hacienda de Vega yet?" my friends from Escondido asked me. "We just ate there. It's really pretty but not too authentic. They don't have much real Mexican food — you know, no tacos or fajitas."

"No tacos?" I said to myself. "I'm on my way!"
Over time, I've probably spent about a year blissfully eating my way around the Mexican mainland, from Guaymas to the Guatemalan border. The further south you get, it turns out, the fewer your chances of finding fajitas — they're Tex-Mex, not Mexican. And aside from the myriad of miniature appetizers, most full-size tortilla wraps by any name are merely Latino pub grub — just a quick lunch or ballast for beer. When they're good, I love them madly, but *real* Mexican food is so much more complex, exciting, and tasty. That's why the very rumor of a fajita-free *cocina* sent me and my sweetie zooming up I-15 as fast as the traffic would allow.

Our journey ended at a Latin paradise: a spacious hacienda at the south end of Escondido, a few blocks north of Lake Hodges. An original adobe built in the 1930s and lovingly restored by the Vega family and associates, the huge house sits on nearly two acres of lush grounds. You enter via a stunning whitewashed foyer paved in Saltillo tiles, with airy, high-ceilinged Spanish-style dining rooms to both sides of it, decked out with handsome artisan iron work and, in one of them, a bubbling wall fountain. Tall wooden doors open from the foyer onto a tree-shaded courtyard where a waterfall spills down from the roof to feed a round, stonelined pond about twice the size of the swimming pool at the next-door motel. A well-stocked outdoor bar includes a wood-burning fireplace to warm diners at the bar in cold weather; propane heaters service the fountain area. You can eat at the edge of the pond or sheltered under a lath house with a corrugated fiberglass roof, surrounded on three sides with roll-up netting for shade at the height of day. The tables have leather tops and folksy straw placemats; the Southwestern-style rustic chairs sport wood-lathe frameworks with leather seats that curve comfortably around your back. Next to the lath house, a fence leads to a wellgroomed lawn. This doesn't feel like SUV-ville Escondido. Instead, you're whisked away to San Cristobal de las Casas or some other lovely old colonial town.

Since my friends' visit, chef-owner Patricia



Vargas-Albela has made a few concessions to local tastes, expanding the vast menu to include a fajitas plate, a burrito (dressed with "our secret chipotle sauce"), and some soft tacos. But there's so much more to choose from.

To start, an array of appetizers reaches a peak in two different sampler platters (\$11 and \$15), each officially sized for two but easily feeding four. The first couple of dishes we tasted from the smaller

"Hacienda Sampler" told us that coming here was the right move. The guacamole was hand-chopped and spiced considerably hotter than local Cal-Mex versions — not *picante* 

enough to hurt, but just right and real. It came with *tostone* (chips to you gringos) similar to those you find in Baja — thick, fresh-fried crisp tortilla triangles, still warm from the skillet. There were four dipping salsas: a *verde* (made with tomatillos), a delicious dark-brown *chipotle*, and two red salsas, one smooth, the other rough-textured and piquant with a flavor of fresh chiles.

A tumbler of ceviche stood at the center of the platter — spicy and vibrant, too, with small fried

tortilla rounds alongside to let you make your own mini tostadas (like eating from a street cart in Baja). Chunks of firm white snapper were seasoned in a mixture both spicier and sharper than most north-of-the-border versions. The rest of the appetizer array consisted of numerous variations of mini tortillas, some thin, some dense and substantial, country-style. The latter, called *sopes*, have a declivity in the center like Hostess shortcakes, but they're made from

corn masa, with a strong, earthy cornmeal flavor. Each tidbit had its own distinctive topping of meat, vegetables, or poultry, its own special sauce, and a scattering of fluffy,

salty curds of *cotija* (cottage) cheese. No two tasted alike

There's an adequate wine list, a good list of Mexican beers, and a huge menu of tropical cocktails, including at least a half dozen original margarita variations. (I found the peach margarita just dreamy.)

Soon after this first lunchtime sampling, we returned for dinner with reinforcements from the city to help us devour more. We began that time with the larger appetizer sampler, the "del Patron"

array, a spectacular spread of lively little bites — *sopes, tostaditas*, and mini *quesadillas*, along with fluffy, flavorful refried beans. (They're made with a touch of lard, which Mexicans believe makes beans more digestible. Vegetarians can get them fried in olive oil instead. Señora Vega apparently shares my scorn for canola.) Our group was particularly enchanted with Queso de Vega, a silky fondue of melted manchego and cotija cheeses, which you scoop

up on the tostones.

"Remember Tacos Huitzilapochtle?" I asked my sweetie. "That pretty house way back of Ensenada where the old guy served dishes from the valley of Mexico? I'll bet anything the owner here comes from that area. too." A few more tastes and I realized that she was actually no campesina from the valley but had to be from its epicenter, Mexico City itself, where I've spent about half my Mexican travel time. In countries with distinctive cuisines, the capital city is usually a culinary center where people from all regions move to make a living and promising chefs countrywide go to make their fortunes. There, they cook their own regional food at its finest. Their fellow migrants (at least those successful enough to afford restaurant meals) won't put up with fake takes on their hometown cuisines, while the born urbanites simply expect a lot of flavor for their pesos. Restaurant competition is fierce enough that generally only the best survive. Hence, Mexico City is to Central America as Hong Kong is to China: the place where you'll find the most beloved dishes of the entire area, cooked with a certain big-city flair (or, to quote "La Bamba," "un poco de gracia y otra cosita").

Hacienda de Vega brings Mexico City cuisine to Escondido, emphasizing favorite regional dishes. Chipotlacos was a delightful dish featuring carnitas, some thin-shredded like machaca and some in small chunks, all robed in a rich, dark, spicy sauce, and wrapped in soft tortillas topped with crema mexicana, a substance halfway between American sour cream and French crème fraîche. It comes with arroz rojo, rice lightly flavored with tomato

Pollo con mole, the famous chicken in chocolate sauce from

the town of Puebla, sports a satiny made-from-scratch sauce of great complexity, with equal measures of bitter and sweet, based on the distinctive flavor of cinnamonspiked Mexican chocolate. The chicken piece is a breast, alas, hence rather dry, but gains panache from a light scattering of sesame seeds over the sauce. It comes with a flavorful tan mélange of rice, potatoes, and peas with mysterious herbal notes. The one entrée at this dinner that fell somewhat short was Sarape Snapper, fish baked in banana leaf with a gutsy Veracruzan sauce of tomato, diced chiles, green olives, and minced capers. The only thing wrong with it was the fish itself, which (on a Saturday, with no delivery from Sysco) while still edible, was getting pretty strong with

Every month, Hacienda features seasonal specials. In October, the restaurant will display ornate, morbidly humorous Day of the Dead altars and celebrate with tamales, a favorite holiday food. (We sampled one at a later brunch; read ahead.) Since my visits were in September, the best dish of all was a special commemorating Mexican Independence Day. September also happens to be the one month of the year walnuts are harvested in Mexico and sold (expensively) not just shelled but with the nutmeats peeled by hand. The nuts play a major role in chiles en nogada, stuffed poblano chiles sprinkled with crunchy pomegranate seeds and swathed in a creamy groundwalnut sauce, mimicking the green, red, and white of the Mexican flag. This festive dish was created by talented nuns in Puebla (perhaps at the same nunnery where mole poblano was reputedly invented) to celebrate a September visit of the nation's president. Hacienda's rendition of the dish was marvelous, and the fact that they offer this laborintensive dish at all is exceptional in itself, since it's so hard to find it north of the border in any

Unlike most Mexican restaurants, you'll find a good selection of desserts. Currently, some are purchased, some made in-house, and some are a combination. (Some months in the future, a daughter-in-law will provide all the pastries, once her baby is born.) My favorite featured a sort of soft Mexican cannoli called Buñuelos de Vega, cones of warm fritter batter filled with a tart-sweet, ricotta-like cheese, bathed in a light, soupy cinnamon syrup that's made inhouse. These were almost Middle Eastern in their impact, My friends fell hard for Impossible Cake, a moist, coarse chocolate cake with a licorice undertone, glazed with dark chocolate and topped with a layer of flan. Its intricate mixture of textures and flavors was odd at first, then addictive.

By now, I wanted to eat my way through the whole menu. And one way I could experience a host of flavors in one meal was at the Sunday brunch. It's a radical revision of the standard brunch buffet. You don't have to leave your chair to go to a steam table and scoop up wilting food, the food comes to you, hot and fresh. You choose an entrée (from about seven candidates) and receive, as well, a lazy Susan filled with five fresh, hot Mexican guisos (stews), with warm tortilla chips in the center and, on the side, plates of refried beans, white rice pilaf (with a haunting touch of epazote, a wild, minty herb), and warm corn tortillas. When you've eaten partway through the assortment, servers will ask if you want hot refills - and when you're done, they'll even offer to box up the leftovers to take home. (That in itself is quite a change from typical brunches, where they'd rather throw out good food than let diners take any

The five deliciously varied brunch stews are a form of propaganda — a wily tactic that Señora Vega has adopted to her basic purpose: to educate her patrons about authentic Mexican homestyle cooking. Our favorite, if we had to choose just one, was cortadillo, tender strips of beef and potato chunks in a savory mahogany-colored adobo sauce based on dark, smoky chipotle and guajillo chiles. A close rival for our affection was puerco en guajillo, a succotashlike blend of corn, zucchini, and mild green chiles in a light green sauce surrounding small chunks of pork. Tinga de pollo had shredded chicken in a lively, spicy red sauce, and huevos al Albañil featured puffs of omelet in a light, nippy coral-colored sauce. Finally, there were chicharrones en salsa verde, fatty pork skins sautéed in green sauce. (I'll leave that

With so many sayory flavors arrayed before us, brunch entrées were almost beside the point. My sweetie's braised sirloin tips in chipotle sauce were similar to the cortadillo, but not quite so exciting. Tamales are normally available at brunch only; my chicken tamale (made with breast meat) was, uh, weighty, with a heavy layer of masa. (In fact, the one little change I'd like to see at Hacienda de Vega would be, perhaps, a switch from chicken breasts to skinless thighs for the stewy poultry dishes, e.g. mole poblano, tamales, and maybe even the tinga. More calories, si, but more juice, too.)

one to politicians from Texas.)

One of the best aspects of this array is that, same as at dinner, each dish has the exact right amount and type of hot or semihot chiles to complement its ingredients — enough to offer some zip while still complementing the other flavors. In contrast to most local Mexican food, which is made quite bland for the niños and the gringos, it's fully seasoned for grownup palates. I'd almost forgotten that this is how Mexican food is supposed to be — not fill-'er-up fare, but *fantastico*.

# ABOUT THE CHEF

"It was a ruin," says Patricia Vega-Albela, of the now-stunning Hacienda de Vega. "We had to

restore it completely. The roof leaked in so many places, we had to take off all the tiles one by one and put them back on again. It took six months to restore it before we opened last March.'

A long journey brought Señora Vega to her midlife transition from Mexican homemaker to San Diego restaurateur. "I was never a professional chef; I was a housewife in Mexico City, where I was born. While I took care of the kids, I also took many cooking classes in Mexico City because I had to do a lot of entertaining in my home for my husband's business." Her studies included both traditional regional delicacies and the artistic "new Mexican cuisine."

"One of my sons married an American girl and has been living in Escondido for ten years. When my husband retired from his business, we decided to come and live here. But to do nothing isn't good for your health neither for him nor for me. Now that all the children are married, the house is empty and I decided I needed to work. We thought that having a restaurant would be a nice thing, a very different thing to do. I told my husband, Well, the cooking classes you paid for are now going to be good for something.' We went in with all of my sons and a lot of other people who've been working on it since then. We put all our money in here, and now we're really working hard! We had a well-known restaurant consultant, Howard Solomon, come here and help us at the beginning to show me what to do, because I knew how to cook but not how to run a restaurant.

The only condition I put was that the food should be really Mexican, not Mexican-American. You have so many American-Mexican restaurants here, nobody needs another one, but there was no real Mexican food. And now people are accepting it very well — but we do have to cheat a little. At the beginning we didn't have any tacos or burritos. We serve our signature

steaks, the Tampiqueña and the Sabana, which are like fajitas they're almost the same, and people liked them. But people were asking for fajitas, and even my sons wanted to have them -'Mama, it's business!' they said. So a few weeks ago, we started with some old American dishes. We have a burrito, we have fajitas, we have some enchiladas but very, very different from the ones that restaurants serve here, and we have three dishes of tacos that are also very different from the American ones. And at brunch we serve a big platter of five different authentic stews — that's another way for people here to start to learn about our food.

"We'll be having a beautiful celebration of the Day of the Dead all through October. You know that Mexicans don't respect death. We like to celebrate our dead relatives and friends by preparing altars with offerings of food, cigarettes, drinks — the things they enjoyed when they were alive. I have a collection of skeleton puppets dressed like people who are significant in Mexico — I have a Frida Kahlo, I have a torero, I have La Catrina, which is famous because Diego Rivera painted a fresco with her, a skeleton with a big sombrero with feathers and flowers and a fancy dress. I wanted to display these artworks so that I can enjoy them, and also to show that we're not just mariachis with big sombreros and fiestas filled with too much color and tacky things. We are Mexicans; we have some bad things, but also some very nice things, very good traditions. It's nice for Americans to understand this, and for Mexicans who are living here to remember their traditions. We're hoping that eventually, when we get used to the work here, we can do a series of the 'Tastes of Mexico.' We have 21 states in Mexico, so we'd have one month for each — the distinct dishes of each region. My idea is to show the people the real Mexico - the culture and the food." ■

# **Raw Deal**

his is like coming to a foreign land. Hank and I almost tippy-toe in. I've hauled him to this bright new green, yellow, and maroon place in Chula Vista. People chowing down

inside talk between tables to each other, as if they belong to the same club. They're eating platefuls of greens but also attacking what look like wraps, pizzas, spring rolls, burgers, meat loaf...

'But how is this possible, dude?" Hank almost whispers it. "I mean, if everything is organic,

number one, vegan, number two, and number

"Raw?"

"Right. How can all these pizzas, burgers, meat loaves be...raw?'

"This could be the end of the burger world as we know it," I say.

"Take my word for it," Hank says. "Meateaters are going to be the next smokers. Like, they'll have signs up. 'Thank You For Not Eating Meat.' 'Non-Carnivores Only.' People will stand outside offices on the sidewalk, sneaking burgers. I mean, what are we doing here, dude?

Enzymes, dude. Vital. They only work if you don't cook them to death. That's what it said on the website. Besides, we want to see what da heck they can make for a, like, man-size lunch, without cooking anything."

A smart, small, spiky-red-haired lady comes up. Cristina. "Yes, we are the first raw restaurant in San Diego County," she says, when I ask her.

She hands us green menus.

"Welcome," says the menu, "to San Diego's first organic, vegan, and 100 percent raw restaurant...We wish radiant health to you and our planet!"

"Something to drink while you're deciding?"
"Uh, water," I say.

"Uh, margarita," Hank says. 'What?'

"Fine. I'll be right back."

"Margarita, dude?

He shoves a little "fresh juices" menu across. "Raw Margarita. Green apple, ginger, lime, and a pinch of ground cinnamon, 8 ounce, \$2.95, 16 ounce, \$4.95.

Hope he's getting the 8-ounce. I'm paying for this sortie. They have others, like Cleansing Cocktail (carrot, green apple, celery, beet, parsley) and Popeye's Punch (spinach, carrot, tomato, cucumber, lemon).

"Ya-ikes!" he says when he gets to slurp the green glassful. "That's...man! Tart, but not bad."

I try a bit. Tough love, for sure, but the limeginger combo does grow on you.

Thing about the menu is, it looks so normal. Soups, salads, wraps, appetizers, entrées, desserts. But the soups, such as spicy tomato bisque or cucumber tahini (\$3.00 for a cup, \$4.95 for a bowl) are guaranteed to be warmed only. Not over 112 degrees. That'd kill those little enzymes.

Salads (\$7.25) look interesting, like Japanese Sea Vegetable. It mixes vitaminy, seaweedy things like "arame" and "dulse," along with red peppers and bok choy. Or the avocado, half filled with a wild-rice-and-cranberry mix. Or even a "cultured" pearled barley salad with cabbage.

Wraps (\$7.95), like the Buenos Vida, have soaked raw wild rice, "cheese," and "cilantro paté." The ForTuna has a sunflower-pumpkin seed paté with flax oil and dulse flakes.

'Sounds far out. Tastes like gruel, I bet," says

I'm wondering about the Cilantro Burger no mention of meat, but tomatoes, flax seeds, red peppers, garlic, and mushrooms. Does this mean they crush them? At \$8.95, it's not too cheap. Or else the walnut-mushroom loaf (\$9.95) with pumpkin seeds and walnuts. "Served warm with our sweet barbecue sauce."

"New world, dude, going places no man has gone before here. Oh. How about this? Sample platter. \$12.50.'

Huh. That may be the way to go. You get all of these unheard-of takes on things you thought you knew. Like, two "nori rolls" ("daikon sprouts, red peppers, cucumbers, avocado, wild rice, and a carrot-pine nut paté. Served with a Japanese dipping sauce"), or the spring roll (rice paper wrapped around things like broccoli sprouts, peppers, avocado, and jicama), and a chili relleno (except it's rellenoed with "a Mexican paté" and the house "cheese"). Then two "raw-violis" (a "pine nut-basil cheese" between slices of Roma tomatoes), a small "pizzzzaza" ("crispy multi-seeds crust" topped with tomato sauce, "cheese," onions, peppers, olives), plus a house salad.

But when Courtney, who's the house manager, comes to take our order, I impulse-add the walnut-mushroom loaf.

"You've just gone beyond a Jackson," says Hank.

"I know," I say. "But new territory, dude. If you don't speculate, you can't accumulate.'

When it all comes, there are two surprises. No, three. One is that these are not huge quantities. Each sample is delicate, looks nice, but a boa constrictor like Hank could open his jaw and down it in one. Two is, they have real flavor. The teriyaki-like sauce that comes with the nori rolls is great, and the prune sauce goes great with the spring roll. And the walnut-mushroom loaf is as tasty as any meat loaf.

And, three, we're actually starting to fill up. "The secret is the enzymes," says Cristina.

"Because there is so much more life in the food, you need less.'

She has color Kirlian photographs that are supposed to show the energy living things give off. The uncooked plants send out great auras, twice as big as the ones of the plants that have been cooked.

Oh, God. Now I'm seeing the desserts. Apple-cranberry pie topped with house ice cream, spice cake made of dates, figs, nuts, papaya.

"We love it here," says Samantha. She's ten. She and Stefanie, her sister, are at the next table with their father, Raul. "We hate greasy junk food. Your stomach always feels bad after it."
"So," says Hank. "You buying dessert? If you



# Symbol Mystique

"Often the client wants to overdress the package. The client will think about it for too long."

he classic definition of an icon is a sign or symbol that uses a kind of key to represent a person, thing, or concept," says Jeffrey Caldewey, package designer and co-author of Icon: Art of the Wine Label. "In the case of a wine label, it's a visual shorthand to communi-

cate what is really a very complex story of the wine and its maker" — with an emphasis on the latter. In the book, Caldewey calls his clients "patrons," but they are not simply money men; he depends on them for input as well as support. "It's a collaborative affair, a process of refinement. At

the very best, a package should be a complete reflection of the producer."

What Caldewey chases when designing a package is not so much a visual translation of the flavors within the bottle as a concrete expression of the producer's vision and character. "What's even more important to me than the wines is the sense of place: the property, the people. At some level, wine is wine. There are varying degrees of refinement, sophistication, and mystique, and we're sort of in the business of helping to create the mystique end of it." Sometimes, he says, the wines themselves "can only add a level of confusion. I find it's actually less helpful to taste the wine than it is to know the people.

"This is much more like psychiatry than anything else, I think. You become so incredibly involved with these producers, their lifestyle. For a short time, you sort of become their best friends. You have to, because you're searching for clues: their lifestyle, their furniture, the color combinations on the walls, the paintings. It's that personal. Oftentimes it's things that aren't directly involved in the vineyards. They always have some other passion in their life that makes them unique individuals, and that's what this whole thing is about: trying to differentiate their package from everyone else's. You do that by telling their personal story. If they happen to be involved in horses, you're at the horse shows looking at their horse — it can be almost anything.

Icon provides a high-gloss, life-size showcase for the work of Caldewey and his partner (and brother-in-law) Chuck House, Of the two, Caldewey seems the more likely to go for an actual icon, sometimes cast in the formal sym-

bol of a crest. The label for Fess Parker winery, founded by a man who once played Davy Crockett on-screen, features a tiny coonskin cap. Signorello gets the face of Michaelangelo's Bacchus, Kunde — a venerable producer — an early version of the California state seal discovered at the winery.

Besides providing the iconic symbol, the producer can also set the tone for the whole label. The Rusack winery in Santa Ynez, which recently came under new ownership, provided one such example. "They had another package before this one. It was very baroque, and I don't think it was very sophisticated. I didn't think it supported the price point, which is what you're really trying to do with a wine package. And it certainly didn't tell their story." Caldewey visited the winery and remarked upon the Catalina tiles covering the floor. "They said, 'Oh, our grandfather started a tile factory on Santa Catalina Island.' I said, 'That's fantastic. That's a wonderful story.' Plus it provided wonderful graphics, which is what you're always looking for." He later found that the grandfather, heir to the Wrigley fortune, actually owned Santa Catalina Island, and that his heirs — Caldewey's clients — had maintained




possession. "They never said a thing about it." Caldewey caught the family's reserve with a lean, spare label and their history with a tiny, brilliantly colored paving-tile crest.

Sometimes the label itself becomes the symbol, as in the case of Blue Rock. "The gentleman who owns that winery is from New York. He wanted something sort of glamorous and not earthy." Caldewey gave him glamour but did it without giving up the dirt — this was Blue Rock, after all. The label, a narrow strip of iridescent blue set high on the bottle and adorned with nothing but the winery's name in silver and a tiny silver star, references "the ribbons of serpentine strata running deep below the surface" of the vineyard.

The Blue Rock package also provides "a great example of how you can make a capsule [the covering at the top of the bottle] work with a label." A narrow band of blue at the very top of the bottleneck allows the mostly black capsule to 'repeat the theme in a subtle way, and do it in a slightly offbeat manner — the decoration on the capsule is not where you expect it to be. You either want the capsule to disappear and let the label speak for the package, or you can use the capsule as an accent. In many cases, the capsule is the only color element. Ostensibly, the book is about labels, but what it's really about is the whole package. It's all interrelated; we choose the bottles, we design the closures, and we design the containers that the bottles go into."

That kind of complete control over a prod-



uct's presentation allows Caldewey to exercise what might be termed a passion for restraint. Here, he says, he may have to bring a little more forth than back to his collaboration with a client. 'There's a lot of salesmanship involved in designing. Many times you have to make the client do the right thing for the brand. Often the client wants to overdress the package, and the longer you have to develop a project, the more that overdressing is likely. The client will think about it for too long." The opulent-yet-minimal technique he pioneered of using gold lettering applied directly to the bottle is "part of the idea that the wine is so good that you don't really have to have a label." (The golden "label" for Lyeth reveals nothing more than the winery's name and the vintage.) In the case of Ramian's "Chapter One" wine, the label is simply an "R" key from an old Smith Corona typewriter. Other information is "relegated to an understated neckband. I like things applied to glass. What I really like is the glass bottle itself. I like to have the most minimal statement possible on it — really, it becomes like a one-foot-tall sculpture." ■

#### **NORTH COASTAL**

Calypso Cafe 576 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-632-8252. This "Calypso" has nothing to do with Caribbean music (or food), despite its tropical tiki-hut decor. The cuisine is French, ranging from old warhorses like onion soup and coq au vin to newfangled Gallo-Cal-Italian-Pacific Rim hyphenates such as ahi pissaladière (seared tuna pizza). The traditional dishes are generally the most successful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. Although there's nothing revolutionary coming from this kitchen, the cooking is generally agreeable. Dinner nightly, reservations advised. Upper moderate. — N.W. (9/01)

**Del Mar Pizza** 211 15th Street, Del Mar, 858-481-8088. If you've heard about, dreamed about, or were merely

curious about New York pizza, the best local practitioner is now in Del Mar, complete with New York manners. The hot sandwiches are good, but the pizza is in a league by itself. The secret lies in the crust. Lasagne and stuffed eggplant also available, as well as cannoli for dessert. Open daily, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. — E. W.

I Trulli Trattoria 830 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-943-6800. An enduring hit in Encinitas (where there's no shortage of Italian restaurants), I Trulli serves modern Italian food with fashionable new ingredients. The menu, subtitled "Nouvelle Italian Cuisine," resembles the somewhat ambitious, generically "northern Italian" bills of fare that you encounter all over Hillcrest and the Gaslamp. (It is, in fact, a sister restaurant to Hillcrest's Arriverderci.) The signifiers of seriousness are the pink peppercorns, goat cheese, sun-dried tomatoes, and light cream sauces that coexist with the more traditional mozzarella-tomato sauce arrays. Best bets are the daily specials, which offer the greatest chance for fresh ingredients and creativity. Busy, cramped, painfully loud inside. Street patio next to highway is also noisy. Reserve for dinner on weekends or expect an hour's wait. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *N.W.* (11/01)

Knockout Pizza 2959 Carlsbad Boulevard, Carlsbad, 760-434-4468. It's New York pizza only here. "People back East are more traditional," says owner James, the ex-boxer, an old sparring buddy of the Bronx Pizza guys in Hillcrest. "We don't do California thick crust, we don't do pineapple, we don't do chicken. We don't do 'personal size,' either. But we do do slices." They make the pies with traditional thin, crisp crusts and toppings like pepperoni, meatball, garlic, and "whitestone" (mozzarella, Parmesan, ricotta, garlic, and spinach). Maybe their best is the "Bronx Special," an assortment of pepperoni, sausage, onions, olives, mushrooms, pepper and garlic, said to fell New Yorkers quicker'n one of James's right uppercuts. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

# SNICKERS BREAD PUDDING WITH CARAMEL SAUCE

BY ANDY HENFLER

Owner, Café on Park, San Diego

HOW TO DO IT

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. To prepare the pudding, place milk chocolate in a double boiler or a smaller pot or cup inserted over warm water on low heat to melt the chocolate. Or you can melt chocolate in a heavygauge pot, stirring and watching so it does not scorch. Set aside. In a large bowl, mix egg yolks and brown sugar with a wooden spoon until creamy. Add vanilla and heavy cream and mix. Stir in melted milk chocolate.

Quarter bread slices and add to mixture. Let

bread absorb ½ of the mixture. Pour into 4″-deep 9″x 9″ pan coated with nonstick spray. Add Snickers to the top of the pudding.

Cover pan with aluminum foil. Place pan into a larger baking dish filled halfway with hot water creating a water bath. Bake in preheated oven for 1 hour.

Remove pan from hot water bath and remove foil. Return pudding to the oven for 20 minutes or until pudding is golden brown.

Let stand 1 hour before serving.

To prepare the sauce: Place water and sugar in medium-sized saucepan. Cook over medium heat until sugar has become dark brown. Remove from heat. VERY slowly add the cream and stir constantly with a wire whisk. Return to heat and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and cool. Serve over pudding. Serves





The menu strikes a balance between American and Greek fare. The baked Greek half-chicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gyros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American three-egg breakfast specials with

home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburgers, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkeyburger. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

**St. Tropez** 947 South Coast Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Cen-

ter #103D, Encinitas, 760-633-0084. If you love continental breakfast, this bright café with indoor-outdoor seating offers scores of house-baked pastries (among them the rare, elusive brioche) and four styles of coffee, in-

cluding an excellent French roast. Parisian-style brunch/lunch choices embrace croque monsieur and croque madame (grilled ham and cheese sandwiches, topped with either light cream sauce or an egg), crepes, quiche, onion soup gratinée, or a chicken-filled volau-vent puff-pastry shell. Omelets are rather weighty. Some of the sandwiches offer Mediterranean flavors — try a pan bagnat (salade niçoise on a baguette) or one of the grilled panini. Desserts range from cookies on up to elaborate cakes. Open daily, breakfast to very early dinner. Inexpensive. — N.W. (10/01)

**Teriyaki 101** 250 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-632-8813. This surfer hangout has a secret: Behind a gate just south of the restaurant there's a sheltered outdoor dining patio decorated by a tropical mural of island life above and below the water. "Eat Healthy, Feel Good" is the motto on the menu, and teriyaki is the dish that dominates it. But this is Hawaiian teriyaki, with lighter, cleaner flavors than the Japanese version. The darkmeat "Maui chicken" skewer and the moist ono (pink snapper) kebab are especially succulent; you can also opt for pork, veggies, numerous combos, and charbroiled burgers (of beef, fowl, or veggies). Everything comes with rice (white or brown), pleasingly touched with teriyaki sauce. Open Tuesday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (10/01)

Tip Top Meats 6118 Paseo Del Norte, Carlsbad, 760-438-2620. This geranium-splashed blue-and-white Bavarian chalet is more than a butcher's shop. It's a combination butcher-deli-diner. Enter through the bulging deli and listen for the shouts and clatter of serving ladies. Look for the "Es ist Wunderbar!" sign over the counter. Try German and American dishes like Big John's all-you-can-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage. Owner Big John is a heavyweight Olympic boxer from the former East Germany with an MA in meat sciences. Generous portions abound. Weekends after 4 p.m., he roasts his famous prime rib dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)


Vigilucci's 505 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-942-7332. In the Land of 10,000 Trattorias, this is one of the most popular — and for good reason. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning — that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations include Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Pizzeria in Leucadia, and Vigilucci's Seafood and Steakhouse in Carlsbad. — N.W. (10/01)

The Village Grill 2833 State Street (at Carlsbad Village Drive), Carlsbad, 760-729-3601. This little café is famous for two things: its vintage Coca-Cola decorations and its delicious Tommyburgers, named after the guy who opened this place back in 1976. Tommy believed in fresh ingredients, says son Dale, now in charge, who orders only "extra lean" meat from the local butcher for his burgers. Nobu Japanese Restaurant 315 South Coast Highway 101, Solana Beach, 858-755-0113. The menu at this gourner Japanese restaurant offers 100 sushi items, 20 stunning and unique appetizers, and a long list of entrées. Two dining rooms are available; the livelier is at the sushi bar. Especially on the weekends, arrive early to avoid waiting for a table. Reservations advised for dining room, not accepted for sushi bar. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — E.W.

Tony's Jacal 621 Valley Avenue (between Genevieve Street and Juanita Street), Eden Gardens, Solana Beach, 858-755-2274. Come here at night, when the mysterious low mud-brick arches with the stained glass windows make you think Old Mexico, when the Del Mar racing bar makes you think 1930s Hollywood, and the dining patio, under the 100-year-old chinaberry tree, looks straight out of Guadalajara. Back in 1946, Tony Gonzales's wife Catalina started preparing food for fellow Mexican workers. Since then, everybody from Liz Taylor to J. Edgar Hoover has passed through these portals. Try the "La Colonia" combination of just about anything with rice and beans. Turkey meat is big here, and the (real) crab quesadilla in a corn tortilla is delicious too. Cheapest: probably chicken strips with French fries. And "Jacal"? It means "shack." Open seven days, but with a gap between lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/02)

#### LA JOLLA

The Cheese Shop 2165 Avenida de la Playa, La Jolla, 858-459-3921. Used to be the Cheese Shop had 100 varieties of cheese from all over. No more. "The cheese trade is dead," says owner Phil Schutz. They still have all-cheese sandwiches with mixes of provolone, Monterey Jack, Cheddar, Swiss, Muenster, Danish Havarti, or Norwegian Jarlsberg. But today this small, busy café is more famous for its "overstuffed" meat sandwiches. The leg of lamb, top round beef, and roast pork loin are all spit-roasted right beside you as you walk in, to waken your taste buds. Cheeses like crumbled Greek Mizithra add tang to the taste. If you're into salami and ham, try the foot-long. Free peanuts while you wait. Inexpensive. Other location: 627 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-232-2303, open daily breakfast to late lunch, with delivery to downtown addresses. — E.B. (10/01)

**Daily's** Renaissance Towne Centre, 8915 Towne Centre Drive, La Jolla, 858-453-1112. The restaurant is owned by a doctor who has devised a menu that's low-fat, low-calorie, low-sodium. The dishes look and taste wonderful. All items available for takeout. Lunch and dinner (same menu) daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.* 

French Pastry Shop 5550 La Jolla Boulevard (at Forward Street), La Jolla, 858-454-9094. A longstanding fixture of the Bird Rock area, this bakery/restaurant includes both a simple, spacious dining room and a shaded patio (reputedly San Diego's first dining patio). Breakfast — a highlight of the menu — is served until 4 p.m. The whisper-thin crêpes with luscious stuff-

ings speak in a Gallic accent. Other possibilities include omelets, eggs Benedict variations, and fine-quality brioches and croissants. Pastries are moist, fairly light, and very sweet. Dinner entrées focus on updated French classics, e.g., duck breast a' l'orange, with "early bird" bargains. Open daily for breakfast through early dinner. — N.W. (5/02)

George's At The Cove 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-4244. The always-excellent George's, with its first-rate fish and meat menu, boasts three dining levels on its ocean-view site. The first level is the fine dining room, with full menu and gourmet lunch and dinners. Above is the Café, and on top is the Terrace, which is romantic on balmy nights. The Café and Terrace offer identical menus: light meals for lunch, extensive menu for dinner. The Ocean View Room offers high-quality California regional cuisine, with higher prices. Food is well prepared and their famous roasted chicken, bean, and broccoli soup is still on the menu. Incomparable service. Call for exact hours. Expensive, George's gourmet room; moderate to expensive, other rooms. — E.W. (9/99)

Harry's Coffee Shop 7545 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-7381. When Harry Rudolph II opened Harry's back in 1960, his idea was simple: to create a down-home eatery and soda fountain where all La Jolla — rich, poor, Brahmins, and gardeners) — could mix and meet with plenty of good eats. Everyone from Joan Kroc to Junior Seau to Brooke Shields has been spotted here, along with regular folks who've been coming in for three decades. Now Harry III reigns quietly among a dozen whirling dervish waitresses at lunch, while his dad still works the breakfast shift. The big hamsteak

and eggs is a favorite breakfast, as is the simple, rich "Hot Creamy Oatmeal" with strawberries. Pecan pancakes and thin, crisp waffles ring true to many Easterners (though Harry offers thick Belgian-style waffles, too), and for lunch, turkey burgers and the baconloaded British Burger are popular. At the counter, the banter between beenhere-forever waitresses and customers sounds like family life. Nice sidewalk patio, too. Long lines on weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B. (2/03)

India Palace 7514 Girard Avenue (at Pearl, across parking lot from Vons), Suite 10, La Jolla, 858-551-5133. In one of the best (and prettiest) Indian restaurants in the area, the refined cuisine of the north is served in a curvacious, serene room with a domed ceiling. Most dishes are gently spicy, but you can specify your preferred hotness. Stunningly tender tandoori sea bass (and a rich, slightly sweet stew made from it, fish masala) is a house specialty. Vegetable entrées are also out standing, particularly the sprightly navrattan korma, mixed veggies in a luscious nutty, creamy yogurt sauce. Other fine choices include tandoori lamb dishes, stir-fried prawns *karahi*, lamb *pasanda*, and eleven house-made Indian breads. Fried appetizers, how-ever, tend to be greasy, and chicken in all preparations is overcooked dry breast meat. For dessert, don't miss the fresh, fruity house-made mango kulfi (Indian ice milk). Service is competent and cordial. Reserve for weekends. Open daily. Bargain-price buffet lunch (à la carte also available). Dinners in-expensive to low moderate, with a price-leap for tandoori meats. – N.W. (6/01)

The Pannikin Cafe 7467 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-5453. Oh

sure, the inside of this converted bungalow is cool, with its woody-green ta-bles of different heights and cool damsels with animal temp-tattoos on their arms serving you. But here at Pannikin's La Jolla outpost, the outside's the "in" spot, with its brick and earth tones and weathered timber and sixties rainbow tables. But you have to make it through the laptop-clacking, cell phone-blabbing crowd who use this as their garden office and Very Important Meeting spot. Musicians, grad students, and school kids also show up to munch twigs and nuts and think seri-ous thoughts. Breakfasts are mostly steamed-egg variations, including the popular Greek eggs and a filling breakfast burrito. For lunch, a mild chicken curry is a nutty treat, and "pannwiches' such as ham or tuna are fresh, generous, and worthy, though the retros among us will be looking for a salt lick all the way home. Inexpensive. -E.B. (2/03)

**Sante Ristorante** 7811 Herschel Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-1315. The name is Italian for "saint," and the Northern Italian/regional cooking shines here, especially the fish and seafood dishes. Fresh seafood specials are available every night, in addition to those on the menu. Excellent chopped salad, pasta with mushrooms, ravioli with quail, and lamb chops. Separate room for bar; separate private dining room. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Enclosed patio for lunch. Not to be missed. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — *E.W.* (4/99)

Sushi On The Rock 7734 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-1138. This noisy, high-energy spot — a boxy, saloon-like space with a sushi bar in back — draws a lively twenty-something crowd (although older folks will

have plenty of company, too). Unlike more traditional sushi bars, there's a vast selection of "rock and rolls" huge, creative *futo-maki* party sushi. And they're fabulous, with sparkling fresh seafood and immensely clevel combinations. Try, for instance, the shrimp tempura roll, which wraps fried shrimp, crab shreds, daikon sprouts and Japanese mayo in deep-fried salmon skin — the combo would be just as impressive as an appetizer at a top Cal-French restaurant. The Orange Crush is another sublime invention. fresh and crunchy with veggies and to biko wrapped in suave salmon. Even simple rolls are so well-conceived, and the rice so nicely seasoned, you won't need soy-wasabi dip. The one-time menu of cooked dinner entrées, how-ever, is now minimal. No reservations, long waits (in cramped entryway) on weekends. Full bar, good sake list. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly, with deep discounts for Happy Hour specials. Moderate. — N.W. (6/01)

### MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Adam's Steak N' Eggs 1201 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-291-1103. Morning munchers take heart! Adam's has served nothing but breakfasts since 1966. The menu runs from healthy — hot oatmeal with raisins, dates, sunflower seeds, almonds, pineapple and coconut — to corn fritters to a Southern brunch of spicy sausage patties, biscuits, gravy, grits, and eggs, to spiced apple crepes with whipped cream and pecans. 



This bricky, dark wood, clubby, business-convention-tourist kind of place has ver-ry faithful customers. But if you want to walk there, be ready for lack of sidewalks, one-way bus access, and wild morning traffic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

Aladdin's Cafe 5420 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-573-0000; Uptown Shopping Center, 1220 Cleveland Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-574-1111. These cafés offer a bright, clean atmosphere for bright and clean, if rather generic, Middle Eastern favorites (hummus, tabbouleh, kebabs, shawerma, etc.), plus imaginative Levantine-flavored pizzas and salads. There are ample choices for vegetarians. The Hillcrest location offers beer and wine. Inexpensive to moderate. *N.W.* (11/00)

**Dumpling Inn** 4619 Convoy Street #F, Kearny Mesa, 848-268-9638. Holein-the-wall? Yes. But what a hole-inthe-wall. For those who love the Far East and its food, finding the Dumpling Inn is a little revelation. It's located in the busy Jasmine/Korean Market Center among Oriental herbalists, mansize-vase shops, even feng shui experts. The Inn itself is tiny but charming. Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold firecrackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd conical straw hat. The food is serious but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried three-ingredient lo mein (thick noo-dles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are challenging and exciting, as is the Dumpling Dinner (including hot-andsour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork, bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jellyfish salad — crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Lunch and early dinner. The Good Egg 7947 Balboa Avenue (off Convoy Street), Kearny Mesa, 858-565-4244. The menu offers omelets, gourmet pancakes, waffles, and several different kinds of frittatas. Freshly squeezed fruit juices are available, and for lunch there are burgers, salads, and a long list of sandwiches. Breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. -

New Shanghai 4681 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-569-4833. New Shanghai is busy, friendly, and draws a mostly Chinese clientele because their Chinese food isn't "Americanized." Whatever your gastronomic politics, try the generous plateful of dry braised shrimp, the "de-fatted pork shoulder," the hot tripe, and the ingenious red bean pancake dessert. Inexpensive to moderate. — M.N. (4/99)

Shogun Kobe 5451 Kearny Villa Road, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-7399. This restaurant specializes in well-seasoned Japanese-style steaks, either by themselves or in combination with lob-ster, shrimp, or scallops. All entrées arrive with soup, salad, rice, and Japanese-style vegetables. Seating is communal at the teppan tables. There's also an attractive, well-stocked sushi bar. Open daily. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

Fairouz Cafe And Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at low cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *E.W.* 

Jared's 880 East Harbor Island Drive, Harbor Island, 619-291-1028. The house specialty is steak, offered in a room directly on the harbor. Presentation, in the manner, of Morton's, is to show you the entrées raw. Price of entrée includes nothing else; vegetables, potatoes à la carte. Excellent appetizers, especially five-onion tart. First-rate bread and bread pudding. Dinner only, Wednesday through Sunday. Reservations required. Expensive. — E.W.

Karinya Thai & Vegetarian Cuisine 825 Garnet Street (SeaCoast

Square), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie *The Beach*, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes getting off on the coconut curries like gang ped, panang, and kang kari. Or noodle dishes like the famous *pad thai*. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai origins. The tom yum kung (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table, the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course *nam pla*, Thai fish sauce. A nice counterpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: pad talay, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in The Beach. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (2/03)

Lotsa Pasta 1762 Garnet Avenue Pacific Beach, 858-581-6777. The menu of this large, loud family restaurant offers a clever gimmick: You pick your noodles (from 9 flavors, 6 shapes, plus 7 stuffed pastas), then choose one of 17 sauces to dress them. For a little extra, you can add ingredients such as garlic shrimp, bread-heavy meatballs, or good spicy sausage, or create a pastacombo. Entrées come with salad or soup (with 3 flavor choices either way) and garlic bread. But don't expect authentic Italian cooking, or even Italian-American; the fare is more small-town American-Italian, with uniformly thick pastas, mainly weighty sauces, and co-pious wafts of oregano. (The vodka sauce and Thai peanut sauce aren't too bad.) The biggest deal here is *timpano*, a bread-shell enclosing a cornucopia of pastas, sauces, cheeses, and meats (made famous by the movie *The Big* 

Night). A retail counter offers most items for take-home do-it-yourself. Wines are cheap, and taste like it. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

Ranchos Cocina 1830 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-226-7619; 4705 Point Loma Ave-Beach, nue, Ocean Beach, 619-224-9815, Also at 3910 30th Street (at University Avenue), North Park, 619-574-1288. At all locations of this delightful mini-chain, you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak — in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an antojito stuffed with beef — it's stewed, not ground. And sample something with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, tryanything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No reservations, but call ahead for large parties. Inexpensive. — N.W. (6/01)

Sportsmen's Seafoods 1617 Quivira Road, Mission Beach, 619-224-3551. Fifty years ago this restaurant-fish market was a tuna cannery, part of San Diego's late-lamented fishing industry. The same Sicilian family still owns it, and still knows every-thing about fish and how to cook it. The menu is devoted to the "fruits of the sea" and includes a wonderful seafood platter (shrimp, squid, clams, fish, fries, and salad). And, of course, a crispy-crunchy fish-and-chips platter. Eat outside on deck, contemplating the

small ships on the bay. They buy seasonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their attached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fishermen. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Mondays. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

The Third Corner 2265 Bacon Street (at West Point Loma), Ocean Beach, 619-223-2700. Chef Derek Ridgeway (collaborating with owner Ed Moore, also of Thee Bungalow across the street) focuses here on Mediterraneanstyle seasonal seafood, with some meat and poultry entrées for dedicated carnivores. The fare is highly creative but rational — try the ethereal (not an oxymoron) cabbage-wrapped seafood "chartreuse" with sauce Nantua, the wild mushroom strudel, the potatocrusted salmon, or the lake whitefish in any preparation. A huge wine list of-fers food-friendly bottlings chosen to complement the cuisine at below-normal markups. To request a specific wine from Thee Bungalow's larger cellar, call ahead. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

World Famous 711 Pacific Beach Drive, Pacific Beach, 858-272-3100. Located directly on the boardwalk with an unobstructed view, this casual restaurant offers patio or indoor dining. Food preparation is straightforward — nothing fancy, but fresh, wholesome, and offering large portions. Thirty appetizers available in the bar. Combination dinners with steak and seafood are expensive. Brunch is served Saturday and Sunday to 3 p.m.; breakfast, lunch, and dinner daily. Inexpensive to expensive. — E.W.

#### **CENTRAL** SAN DIEGO

Big Kitchen 3003 Grape Street (between 30th Street and Fern Street), South Park, 619-234-5789. This isn't just a restaurant, it's the social center of the universe — and Judy "The Beauty" Forman is its queen. Blame her for the Fern Street Circus, for driving the Miss California beauty pageant out of town, and for disgustingly healthy dishes like Judy's Favorite (spinach, mushrooms, sherry, and eggs). Our favorite: the avocado, cream cheese, and chives omelet. Vegans' fave may be the "veggie option": sautéed spinach, mushrooms, onions, cilantro, brown rice, tofu, and roasted garlic. Her cooks make pretty much everything on the spot, including muffins, waffles, and pancakes. While you're waiting, they always have this "out there" eclectic crowd, plus walls filled with pictures and *bon mots* like "Will Be President For Food." Breakfast and lunch only; closes at 2 p.m. most days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/02)

El Comal 2822 Imperial Avenue, Sherman Heights, 619-239-7101. No border compromises here — just great home-cooking from Michoacan, Guerrero, Jalisco, and Oaxaca, prepared by Luz Herrera Ibarra, a biology teacher from Acapulco. Try the *huarache* (cactus slices with carne asada, frijoles, cheese, and onions) or the *mulita carne* adobada (pork, melted cheese, and guacamole inside two tortillas) and have a glass of nuez (a refreshing walnut drink). Breakfast through early dinner daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Jyoti-Bihanga 3351 Adams Avenue Normal Heights, 619-282-4116. Oh sure, you'll be watching Sri Chinmoy, the Bengali guru, on TV juggling, declaring Geneva International Airport a "Peace Blossom," or boarding his Italian "Treno della Pace." Plus, his books, his portraits, his paintings, and his chant-songs surround you. Apart from that, not only is this heavenly blue-domed restaurant run by his students peaceful, but the fresher-than-fresh Bengali-tinged health food is de-"Neatloaf" bursts with nutty, intriguing flavors. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes different. 

can. On the other hand, Mailo cooked in an OB Greek restaurant for 14 years before he opened here. Plus, the two have made Greek extremely affordable. Prices are definitely down there for their breakfast gyros, with eggs, lamb, tomatoes, and onion wrapped in a hot pita. And they have this great streetcorner outside deck to eat on. There's also plenty of American standard fare. Mailo's cheeseburger, with avocado and bacon, is the most popular, with the half-pound steak burger close behind. American breakfasts are the old fashioned kind with three eggs any style, hash browns, and toast, plus ham or bacon or sausage or even chicken fried steak, at bargain prices. Same for their roast beef dinner, or the quarter chicken, Greek style, served with rice, salad, and pita bread. Open Tuesday through Saturday breakfast through dinner, Sunday and Monday till 4 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

Mama's Bakery And Lebanese Deli 4237 Alabama Street, North Park, 619-688-0717. This informal little restaurant is more interested in quality than presentation, concentrating on the specialties they do well. Recommendations include the deliciously cheap falafel sandwich in Mama's fresh-made saij, (soft flatbread). On cool days warm up to a bowl of fool mudamas, or slow-cooked beans (tasty fava and garbanzos). Antonio's Hacienda 700 North Johnson Avenue, El Cajon, 619-442-9827. If the décor hasn't been updated from its original 1960s-fabu-lous Old California Spanish, it's because there's been no need. The enormous dark-wood chandeliers, the padded-leather wooden chairs, the chainsaw-weathered wood beams all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, reveling in the guitar trio and the exposed kitchen station — such atmosphere! And the flavors are userfriendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. The Camarones Tequila is a little more exciting; the sweetness of its bacon-wrapped shrimp gets a fine counter from the bitter liquor in the marinade. Excellent Enchiladas Suizas: pale, mush-tender shredded chicken wrapped in tortillas and doused with good, tangy green sauce. Lunch and dinner daily. Champagne brunch on Sundays, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; all-day buf-fet Sunday through Thursday. Inexpensive to low moderate. A M (4/03)

Johnny B's 4738 Fourth Street (at La Mesa Boulevard), La Mesa, 619-464-2465. This "Burgers and Brew" bar is a real 1950s place, with burgers to die for and good bar snacks, including a zesty jalapeño dip. Play pool, watch TV, hide from your ex on the smokers' patio out back. On Sundays (1 p.m. to 7 p.m. only), their 10-oz. New York steak, fries, beans, and salad is a must-eat at a rock-bottom price. Open daily; lunch and dinners Monday through Thursday; three meals (until midnight) Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/00)

Tyler's Taste Of Texas 576 North Second Street, El Cajon, 619-444-9297. Unfussy home cooking. Some dishes outshine others. The slab of smoky ham steak that comes with the first-rate breakfast is in itself enough to rouse the sleepiest appetite. Expertly sautéed onions and mushrooms lend flavor to fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebbly-smooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character. For lunch and dinner, the Texas menu features Texas-style barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and

sausage) that's sufficiently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. BBQ beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. Pleasant surprises: a substantial, peppery cornmeal crust on the tender catfish and the fried green tomatoes, and the rich stock in the vegetable soup. Open 24 hours. This is an epicure's oasis in the desert, a combination of gourmet deli and serious café where you can find a lively breakfast, scrumptious picnic lunch, or (on weekends) a light, savory dinner from an imaginative, daily changing menu. Great cheeses, pâtés, extra-virgin oils, artisan breads, delicate pastries and full-bodied French Roast coffee are among the delights that make this the Garden of Eatin' in a town where both grocery stores are pretty dire. 

If you want meat or spicy food, best to order from the menu — say, a creamy tikka masala with lamb, or long kebabs of minced lamb (kebab curry), or the rich Bombay Coconut Malai. Tell them whether you want it mild, spicy or, for leathermouths, "tikhi." For a cheap, light meal, try a couple of lamb samosas. And be sure they bring the chutneys, India's real unexplored treasure. California Cuisine 1027 University Avenue (between 10th and Vermont), Hillcrest, 619-543-0790 This 20-yearold neighborhood favorite underwent an exciting total remake in February, 2003. The hard-edged, mirrored decor's the same, but a new chef, Justin Hoehn (coming from Laurel), has replaced the lengthy grazing menu with fewer but better-honed choices that the small kitchen can execute without a hitch. And the guy has a flawless palate Most appetizers are simple but devilishly clever, literally living up to their name, while entrées exhibit fresh, sophisticated combinations of exquisitely balanced, global flavors, with garnishe smartly chosen to complement the primary ingredient. But save room for a sweet: Dessert Chef Laurel Huffnagle produces the bold, thrilling endings that these meals deserve. The restau-rant is very noisy when busy. Private garden-patio dining available in good weather. Well-chosen wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Friday; dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Upper moderate to expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

The regular entrées offer a choice of sauces (red curry, green curry, etc.) with your choice of protein but go straight to the "Chef's Specialty' items on the menu to find the best and rarest dishes. Stuffed chicken wings are extraordinary, seafood soup talay is fabulous, and among the entrées, don't miss *choo chee* duck or the Queen of Thailand's favorite, Pineapple Fried Rice. — N.W. (5/02)

City Delicatessen 535 University Avenue (at Sixth), Hillcrest, 619-295-2747. Some folk come for the Jewish food (chicken-in-the-pot, brisket of beef, chopped liver), others to soak in the art-deco colors — the cornucopia of fruit above the entrance, the mustard yellow walls, the black-and-white checker tile, or the flower bunches of red, blue, green, and yellow lamps. And then some come for both: the stuffed cabbage roll (with ground beef and rice inside) is a glowering red ball with maroon, oniony, sweet-and sour raisin sauce to die for, set off by green parsley and bright orange slices Scandalously delicious. Downside? Our pastrami sandwich tasted dry and chewy by comparison. But City Deli is less strictly Jewish (they have bacon on their breakfast menu) and more of an everyday New York-style eatery. Wait staff are good-humored, and the See-burg Wall-o-Matic tableside jukeboxes actually work. Bring plenty of quarters. Breakfast all day; early-bird dinner specials; late-night dining. Open from 7 a.m. till midnight; until 2 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/03)

Cottage Cafe & Garden Grill 2321 Fifth Avenue (at Juniper Street), Banker's Hill, 619-696-0071. The Polish feel of this midtown café is palpa ble. The owners vacation in Poland yearly to update the family recipes. But you can eat American if you want, with smidgeons of Russian, Italian, and Greek, too. The "Farmer's Breakfast" is a roundup of chopped ham or sausage, onions scrambled with two eggs, home fries, and toast. Or go Pol-ish with a grilled Polish sausage sandwich stuffed with peppers, onions, and sauerkraut on rye. A full range of Polish specialties shows up on the weekend all-you-can-eat buffet, with stuffed cab-

bage, beef stroganoff, sausages and cabbage, and chicken paprika. Try the Polish beer, "Okocim, 1845," but be careful—it's 8.1 percent alcohol. Great patio out back. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/01)

Gulf Coast Grill 4130 Park Boulevard (between University and El Cajon), Hillcrest, 619-295-2244. The Gulf's faux-rustic, woodsy dining rooms and patio are great hangouts if you like a restaurant with a noisy party atmosphere. The menu focuses on the cuisine of the South and Southwest, with an emphasis on Louisiana and a heavy hand on the salt shaker. The kitchen does best with the straight Southern dishes, turning out divine fried soft-shelled crabs, airy hush puppies, and delicious little corn muffins. If you're deeply familiar with Cajun-Creole flavors, though, don't look for pure authenticity — you'll do better with jambalaya, étouffée, or the lunchtime oyster po' boy than with the soulless gumbo or the misconceived red beans and rice. Heated, smokerfriendly front patio. Wheelchair elevator to rest rooms next to stairs. Free parking lot left of the door. Full bar, Lunch Monday through Saturday, brunch Sunday, dinner nightly (early closing Sunday). Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

Ichiban 1449 University Avenue (at Normal), Hillcrest, 619-299-7203. Is this Paris or Tokyo? At night, the café outside glows like a Van Gogh painting, except the customers are eating sushi and drinking green tea, not red wine. The best values are at lunch, with week-day specials like Bento combos (sushi rolls, crab, salmon, rice) and filling soups overflowing with veggies and thick *udon* noodles. Healthy? You betcha. The miso soup (with every dish) made from soy and seaweed is a great daily iodine fix. Number One that's what "ichi-han" means. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. – E.B. (11/00)

Jack and Giulio's Italian Restaurant 2391 San Diego Avenue, Old Town, 619-294-2074. This long-running, old-fashioned Italian favorite (formerly Giulio's in Pacific Beach) is a low-cost family restaurant with fresh. casual fare. The best bets are angel hair pasta, minestrone soup, and their famous scampi. Outdoor patio is a plus. Open daily, lunch and dinner; continuous service on weekends. Inexpensive to upper moderate. — E.W.

cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touch towering heaps of garnishes. All the edible frou-frou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive *chilpotle* cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a *picante* marinade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the housestyle — sky-high, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Reservations strongly advised. Prices moderate. N.W. (11/00)

Lotus Thai 3761 Sixth Avenue (at Robinson), Hillcrest, 619-299-8272. Ironically, the best dishes at this idiosyncratic, vegetarian-friendly Thai-Chinese restaurant involve char-grilled beef (e.g., *satay*, beef salad) featuring a the long list of house specialties try the lively pineapple-cashew fried rice, the chile-fierce "Crazy Duck" salad, or the savory (if slightly dry) "three-flavor" whole fried fish accompanied by a gar-lic-chile-fruit jam. Appetizers, though are mainly greasy-fried wraps, and too many dishes are oddly bland (even when they're spicy). The flesh components (shrimps, chicken, etc.) all taste like they've been parboiled in plain wa-ter and tossed into the pot at the last minute, with nothing left to give to or gain from the sauces — so if you crave soup or curry, you're best off with the elaborate vegetarian versions. Lunch and dinner daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

Mission Hills Cafe 808 Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-296-8010. Belgian waffles are your natural intro here. Why? Because François, the owner, is Belgian. The man knows waffles. But the thing is how cheap this is for a sophisticated eatery, with its linen tablecloths, waiters in long aprons, and bread baskets. (The bread's incredible. It'll fill you before you spend a dime.) Dishes like Thai chicken or shrimp salad over shredded jicama, cucumber, and carrots are usually rich folks' territory. Ditto the "Pear Cambozola" salad, with strawberries, pecans, and a Camembert/Gorgonzola-style cheese, or "François's Famous Vegetarian Lasagna." And check out François's art on the wall — he always cooks one part in his oven, like the baked bread horses stuck on his piece called "Sea Biscuits." Daily, three meals. Inexpensive by day; more expensive at night, but reason able. — E.B. (9/03)

Trattoria Mamma Anna and Ristorante 228 Washington Street (at Albatross Street), Mission Hills 619-220-7070. The food is Sicilian and the ambience is "neighborhood." "Mamma Anna" herself appears on and off at the eponymic restaurant, a popular Gaslamp spot before she retired and then, months later, revived the restaurant two miles north. The cooking, too, is somewhat on-and-off, but the best dishes can be marvelous. Look for dishes with the fresh, clean marinara sauce and the homemade sausages, and save room for cheesecake. **Bandar Fine Persian Cuisine** 825 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-0101. The best Persian food in the city is prepared here. It's sensuous, low fat, and a blessing to the sight as well as the palate. Try stuffed grape leaves, yogurt, eggplant, charbroiled filet mignon, lamb, or chicken. Order all three kinds of rice. Enchanting interior, wonderful service. Not to be missed. Open daily, same menu lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate.

Bay Cafe 1050 North Harbor Drive, ntown, 619-595-1083. If you're hungry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsom bayview terrace (with no wheelchair access) After a chilly crossing, try the enjoyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced potatoes. The menu features breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches, variations on fish and chips including prawns, and chili dogs (all served with generic fries), plus some entrée salads. The burgers are genuinely "have it your way" - for a few extra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mushrooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). Open daily breakfast to pre-dinner. Inexpensive. — N.W. (8/01)

Chive 558 Fourth Avenue (near Island Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-4483 Eating's an adventure at this coolly minimalist urban bistro where chef A.J Voytko does his magic with a seasonally changing menu of inventive "mod-ern cuisine." Dishes alternate between high-risk global fusion and stringently simple combinations that place out standing ingredients (including freerange chicken and veal) at center stage, accompanied by a revelatory repertory of exotic vegetables. The worldwide wine list offers over 50 choices by the glass. Reserve for weekend dinners, when a chic young crowd pours in. Full bar. No cell phone use inside. Dinner nightly, with weekend service to 11:30 p.m. Expensive. — N.W. (9/02)

**DeMedici** 815 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-7228. This lovely, cream-and-sepia dining room evokes an Italian Renaissance villa, while its sidewalk patio offers a prime pageant of Gaslamp follies. Either way, you'll en-joy exceptional service — attentive but utterly unobtrusive — and a menu centered on succulent pastas and refined seafood dishes. The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering;

Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress or the spiffier side — some Hollywood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, upping the clothing curve. Dinner nightly. Moderate-priced valet parking available. Moderate (simpler pastas) to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

**Downtown Fish Joint** 407 C Street (at Fourth Avenue), downtown, 619-239-3506. Surprise: If you grab a shrimp taco at the Fish Joint and come sit outside at their sidewalk tables, you've found one of downtown's leastappreciated weekday lunch locations. With red trolleys, shady green trees, the old California Theater, and lunchtime foot traffic, the place feels positively swank. Most ask for fish and chips. But if "8 ounces of North Atlantic cod, 5-6 pieces" is too much, ask for the children's half-order. For a splurge, order the 8-ounce grilled salmon or the grilled seafood plate. Open weekdays, lunch Monday through Thursday, plus early dinner Friday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (11/01)

Gargoyle Gallery & Cafe 1845 India Street (at Fir Street), Littly Italy, 619-234-1344. One of the hidden gems of Little Italy, but there's nothing Italian about it. The Moroccan decor with Turkish pillows, exotic lamps tiles, inside tap fountain and a sunlit courtyard all combine to turn a meal here — even though it's mostly modest panini ("small bread") sandwiches — into a really sexy feast. Lots of kalamata olives, feta cheese, mozzarella, ham, and tomatoes. Try "The Moroccan" with grilled eggplant, zucchini, roasted red peppers, raisins, spicy garlic chili oil, and mixed greens. Or "The Spanish" with grilled chicken, manchego cheese, sliced olives, mixed greens, and aïoli. The breakfast menu includes two-egg panini with grilled zucchini, marinated peppers, feta cheese, and orange slices. A must-have: French pressed coffee, a two-cup glass pot with a steel plunger. Open daily for breakfast and lunch. Belly dancing, first Saturday of the month. — E.B. (5/02)

Grand Central Cafe YMCA, 500 West Broadway (at India Street), downtown, 619-234-2233. A nice Broadway surprise - who'd expect the Y" to have terrific meals? But Grand Central tries hard. The breakfasts are big and filling, and the lunch chili with salad and cheese toast is a tasty bargain. So is the veggie-burger with fries, coleslaw, soup, or salad. Plus you can look down onto Broadway and check when your boss is returning to work. Breakfast and lunch weekdays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

**Morton's Of Chicago** 285 J Street, Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxurious, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their Nebraska beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-a-half or three-pound porterhouse, which will be juicy, marbled with flavorful fat. You can also get good fish at Morton's. The big, golden salmon fillet flakes to the fork and is moist, sweet, buttery. The pricey à la carte sides are either bad or mediocre. The Godiva Hot Chocolate Cake is exceptional. But go for the steak. Expensive. — M.N.~(9/99)

Nagi's Bar and Grill 501 West Broadway, downtown, 619-233-5933. Nagi Sekla comes from Egypt, via Paris. Before he took over the lease at the staid Koll Center's bar-eatery, he insisted on creating a sidewalk patio slap-dab on Broadway. His lease is our gain. For the

At lunch or dinner, start off with his homemade soups, but the must-eat is his Spicy Santa Fe Chicken Salad — the magic's in the cranberries and Gorgonzola. Also great: BBQ chicken pizza. Breakfast, lunch, dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/03)

Nutters 428 C Street, Suite 101, downtown, 619-239-7075. They say the kid in you never dies. Find out here, where they have invented a zillion varieties of peanut butter applications to turn into lunch. Peanut butter sandwiches, peanut butter salads... First, decide which peanut butter: creamy, crunchy, or "natural style"? Then, what flavor? Super honey crunch? White chocolate? Carob? German chocolate? Cinnamon raisin? Super honey infused with M&Ms? Then, which bread? (My favorite: challah, a big egg bread.) Then (sigh) the sandwich itself. "Dad's Way" — peanut butter with crushed Oreos? "Mom's Way" — peanut butter and bananas? Or the "An Elvis Sighting" — grilled peanut butter topped with bananas, honey, and bacon. Lunch only. Inexpensive. — E.B. (4/03)

Rainwater's on Kettner 1202 Kettner Boulevard, Little Italy, 619-233-5757. You could order the fish, the chicken, or even the lamb, but odds are you're here because you want steak, prepared by people who respect your enthusiasm and offer prime beef in multiple cuts. And you're here because Rainwater's is venerable and local. You can dine old-style and enjoy it — warm cornbread fingers, a fine loose-packed crab cake, a crisp, watery wedge of ice-berg lettuce under a blue cheese blanket. As for the beef, New York strip takes the day. You actually have to chew it — it ain't filet — but every chomp gives up scads of flavor. Order a side of greaseless, firm-bodied onion rings and wash it down with something from the exhaustive (and expensive) wine list. Lunch Monday through Friday from 11:30 a.m.; dinner daily. Very expensive. — A.M. (6/03)

Spice House Cafe 1401 Ninth Street (at Ash Street), downtown, 619-239-8510. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hangover Omelet. We don't know if it's the Ortega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. The place is a pleasant surprise jutting out into the top foliage of trees sprouting up from Hwy. 163 — the view looks like a forest. Other excellent choices include Portuguese sausage with three eggs, paisano frittata with ham, tomatoes, mushrooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped cream. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Original branch at 9035 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Complex Drive, across from courthouse), 858-565-1028, also serves dinner nightly, with emphasis on Greek-American cuisine. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

St. Tropez Bakery and Bistro 926 Broadway Circle (at Second and Broadway), downtown, 619-696-8695. (Also in Encinitas; see North Coastal listings.) Bright is the word. Bright yellow-and-blue murals of St. Tropez's life and bright sidewalk seating outside. A true sidewalk café. Sitting on the sidewalk here is almost as nice as Nice. Plus, you can eat, drink, or just nurse a coffee for hours. No pressure. But then you'd miss the delish *croque monsieur* (toasted creamy sauce-topped cheese sandwich, French-style) or *croque madame* (same plus fried egg) or *salade miçoise*. It's a bakery too, so the morning croissants are to die for. Must-tries: the "Marseille" (ratatouille on roasted bread) and the salmon salad. Breakfast, lunch, dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/03)

### SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

**Crown City Grille** 926 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-5822. If you thought Coronado had only fat-cat

eateries, think again — the area crawls with burrito joints, pizza joints, rice joints, and burger joints. Yet this new burgery is doing fine. It could be the sheer variety, but mainly it's that they've got the burger basics right. The bun's crisp, the meat's lean and, especially with the bleu cheese model, the taste is to die for. Owners Dave and Jeanne Evans say the pattie's always part sirloin, part New York cut. Also, the jalapeño-bacon cheeseburger is excellent, the Chicago-style hot dog with "sport peppers" is hot and messy, and the Icelandic cod fish and chips is generously portioned and tasty. Plus, beer and wine. Breakfast, lunch, dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/03)

Crown Room Hotel Del Coronado, 1500 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-6611. Let's face it, this is one of the grandest entrances you'll make anywhere, into the enormous, gloomy, vaulted timber dining room where presidents, princes and Marilyn Mon-roe have chowed down. It's only open for Sunday brunch these days. The gigantic eat-till-you're-beat buffet feast ranges from made-as-you-watch omelets to salmon, crab legs, prime rib, dizzying desserts, and even longstemmed strawberries you hand-dip in chocolate. The downside? Monroe here to shoot Some Like It Hot, but (apart from the chocolate) most food ain't. It's either cold (like the croissants, though the chocolate chunk ones are delicious) or luke-warm (like prime rib and eggs Benedict — and those eggs could do with a lot more Benedict). But this is an Edwardian-scale social occasion — see and be seen. The food isn't great, but the atmosphere is grand. Sundays, 9 a.m to 2 p.m. Expensive. -E.B. (9/03)

Da Kine's Plate Lunches 1635 Sweetwater Road, National City, 619-477-8494. Also at 4120 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-274-8494. You go here for your Pacific Island fix - hundreds of Hawaiians do, every day. You'll find Hawaiian license plates and surfboards on the walls, "Aloha Maid" Guava Nec tar, and island food. Although the kalua pig here isn't cooked in an imu hole in the ground — it sure tastes like the real thing and comes with cabbage, rice, macaroni salad, and kimchee. But beware of the *haupia* cake — it may cause serious addiction. Lunch and early dinner Tuesday through Sunday; open Mondays in summer only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/00)

Island Pasta 1202 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-4545. This unassuming, spill-out-on-the-street restaurant somehow got it right. Simple tables on the sidewalk, daily made-on-the-premises semolina pasta, most dishes costing in the single digits. A simple fettuccine Alfredo is a pleasure al fresco with a glass of wine, sparkling against the fresh flowers on the table, watching Coronado's world go by. One good—and vegetarian—special to ask for is the verdure pasta, a combo of artichoke hearts, spinach, capers, mushrooms, onions, and olives over spaghettini. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive.— E.B. (10/01)

Lydia's Cafe and Nightclub 1628 Palm Avenue, Nestor, 619-429-3603. This easygoing dancing/eatery has a faithful following that goes back to 1957. But before you dance, eat! Check out the birria en su jugo (goat in its juices) with beans, rice, and tortillas, or enjoy filling snacks like taquitos, cucaracha (a corn tortilla stuffed with ham, cheese, and sour cream), or the snack Lydia says she invented: botanas (beans, pork, and melted cheese over corn chips). Open from early breakfast to early dinner Sunday through Wednesday, until midnight Thursday and Friday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

McDini's 105 East 8th Street, National City, 619-474-6771. A historic, sprawling bar with a diverse, mellow family scene — all ages, all races, chatting, playing pool, cozying up to the all-encompassing jukebox, or smoking under a roofed front "patio." Or chowing down on industrial-grade pub grub, made largely of restaurant-supply products (including the vaunted corn beef, bland as packaged ham). But the fresh vegetables are surprisingly good, so choose something that includes the luscious mashed potatoes and look upon the rest as garnish. No wheelchair bathroom. Open daily, serving to about midnight. Inexpensive. — N.W. (4/01)

Good soups, too. Daytimes, try the hearty (and then some) Irish meat-fest breakfast. Open daily, standard pub hours. Inexpensive to low moderate. N.W. (4/01)

**Primavera** 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454. This standout in Coronado's culinary scene offers courtly charm and an impressive menu. Try their saffron risotto, clams bordelaise, or the delicious ossobuco, of which every detail is accomplished, admirable. For dessert, have one of their excellent espressos and the tiramisu or lemon ricotta cake. Pritrramisti of femon ricotta cake. Pri-mavera's accomplished staff takes un-pretentious pride in their kitchen, the food and wine they serve, and right-fully so. Open daily. Expensive. — M.N. (11/98)

**Swaddee Thai** 1001 C Avenue (10th Street), Coronado, 619-435-8110. Tourists never stray to Swadee's quiet residential location a block from the bright lights of Orange Avenue. Their loss is the locals' gain. The dining room is a quiet, lovely haven from the hustle; the service is caring and gracious. Even if the long list of Siamese specialties is merely standard, the kitchen, too, is devoted to the art of gently giving pleasure. The peanut sauce accompanying the satay, for instance, is classically balanced; the complex but soothing co-conut-chicken soup can wash away all cares; and the calamari in the many seafood arrays is cleverly knife-scored to achieve sheer tenderness along with good looks. Even the jasmine rice is an exceptionally fragrant brand. Unless you specify otherwise, spicy dishes have a nice nip tuned to brave but tender farang tastebuds. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (9/00)

Tomatoes Plus: A California Bistro 4346 Bonita Road, Bonita, 619-479-8494. If you blink between the Baskin-Robbins and the market in the Bonita Center, you could miss this place. A mistake. Tomatoes charms you with an atmosphere somewhere between mumsy and whimsy. And it bulges with dishes that are healthy but not preachy. This is not thinly disguised rabbit food — not with dishes like chicken and eggplant salad, which comes with delicious roast eggplant and chicken strips bathed in tingling chipotle (mesquite-smoked jalepeño) vinaigrette. Or chicken Florentine (breaded chicken breast with toma toes — of course — plus spinach, cheese, and sautéed mushrooms. To use up more tomatoes, they have lotsa pasta dishes too. And if you're feeling broke, the chili or clam chowder in an edible bread bowl will definitely fill you. Sunday champagne brunch usually has a surprise or two, and the everyday ap-ple sausage omelet breakfast is a sweetsavory treat. Breakfast through dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (4/02)

Acambaro Ave. Iturbide 580 (near Guadalupe Cathedral, between Juarez and calle 6), Ensenada, 646-176-5235. This friendly, family-run restaurant specializes in dishes of central Mexico Breakfasts occupy half the menu, with lots of *huevos* cooked in various classic fashions — rancheros, Mexicanos, scrambled, or fried, with bacon or imitation-Danola ham, plus gringo favorites like hotcakes. The chilaquiles con queso y crema are especially toothsome: perfectly crisped tortilla pieces (neither mushy nor chewy) swathed in vibrant green tomatillo sauce served with great, lardy beans. Open daily, three meals; breakfast served until Very inexpensive. N.W. (4/03)

Big Boy Restaurant 9892 Agua Caliente Boulevard (across the street from the old bullring), Tijuana, 686-3788. Besides having excellent Mexican-American food, this Big Boy knock-off draws some of the most in teresting people in Tijuana - journalists, lawyers, cattle ranchers, politicians, Baja's heavy hitters. Day or night, Big Boy is always busy. Gringo food's no problem. Breakfast includes eggs, ba-

con, sausage, chorizo or ham, plus hash browns or frijoles, toast, juice, and end-less coffee. Nobody will object if you sit sipping the free refills till the moon comes up. But you won't — you'll crack and order more when you smell the popular, macho "royal" ham-burger, with two beef patties, smoked ham, onions, lettuce, tomatoes, fries, and salad. Or the chicken breast marinated in tequila with cilantro, guacamole, and beans. Open 24/7. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Cafe la Especial 718 Avenida Revolución (down the market steps), Ti-juana, 685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American afi-cionados of Tijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros. Summer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-togringos ratio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to carne asada and bistek ranchero, from cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the steamed taco stand up-stairs. That's still going too. Open daily Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/02)

Cien Anos Calle Jose Maria Velazco #1407, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-3039 or 634-7262, altacocina@cien-a.com. This lovely, comfortable, dressy-casual "destination restaurant" serves extraordinary Mexican haute cuisine, graced with a brilliant variety of sauces based on elaborations of Mexican ingredients, including tropical fruits, nuts, and above all a vast variety of chile peppers, each with its own distinctive flavor (not all of them spicy). You could eat here a dozen times and not begin to exhaust the possibilities. Just a few of the treats are mushrooms steeped in beef marrow, alligator meat mini-tacos, *pozole* with crab meat, and an irresistible beef and shrimp stew. (Food critic Ruth Reichl consumed a meal of exotic Aztec delicacies, including ant roe and mezcal worms, and you can try them too when they're in season.) The wine list is devoted wholly to ambitious Baja wineries; you're also welcome to BYO. Bar choices include damiana and hibiscus liqueurs. Menu and staff are bilingual. Reservations (phone or e-mail) are strongly advised; ask for directions. Low-moderate. N.W. (7/01)

La Baguette Blvd. Lazaro Cardenas 1030 (a.k.a. Blvd. Costero, opposite Sanborn's between Castillo and Blancarte), Ensenada, 646-178-2814. For those who take their java straight and strong, this is a good stop for a quick continental breakfast or dessert, with quite possibly the best French Roast coffee in town. Open daily during the day. Inexpensive. — N.W. (4/03)

La Espadana 10813 Avenida Sanchez Taboada, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-1488 or 634-1489. Beautifully prepared meals that include appetizer, soup or salad, and entrée are available in this structure whose name means bell tower and whose exterior resembles a mission. Best bets here are filet steak on a skewer (brocheta de filete), baby back ribs (costillar de puerco), and leg of lamb (pierna de borrego). The ortions are mammoth and the breakfast is excellent. Superb service, de lightful atmosphere. Menus are printed in Spanish and English. Some English spoken. Open Monday through Saturday, 7:30 a.m. to 11 p.m., and Sunday, 7:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Moderate. — *E.W.* 

La Fonda Km. 59, Baja Highway 1 (Alisio exit from toll-road, about halfway between Rosarito and Ensenada), 661-628-7352. It's hard to imagine a better start to the day, in any sweeter ambiance, than at La Fonda ("The Inn"), which offers Mexican and American breakfast dishes and a lavish Sunday brunch buffet with both. Arrive early for patio seating under a straw umbrella with a full-out ocean view. The bilingual menu is written on chalkboards and dinner choices change nightly, featuring American and Mexican seafood entrées and deluxe meats aged in-house. Most staffers speak some English. Full bar, including Bajagrown wines. Open daily, three meals, starting about 9 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate; cash only. — N.W. (4/03)

La Vuelta 8210 Avenida Revolución (above 11th), Tijuana, 685-7309. Bring your lover here and hide away in one of the cuddly *carretitas*— nooks. Even if traffic is ghastly at "the turn" ("*la* vuelta") where Revolución hooks left. you forget all that inside this vestige of Olde Tijuana, with balcony seating, resident mariachis, and food and drink all day and night. Dive into a combinación mexicana (chile relleno, taco, and enchilada) or *carne asada* served in an *olla de barro*, an earthenware pot from Guadalajara. Even the gringo-sound-ing filete mignon with mushroom sauce somehow comes out Mexican. Most Mexicans actually turn up about 1 a.m., after their own parties, to be serenaded

by the excellent 10-piece mariachi band. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (6/03)

Malecon de Puerto Nuevo Northwest edge of Puerto Nuevo; take Calle Entrada (entry road) to the ocean-front bluff, edge right, and walk about 30 feet down a steep dirt road running seaward from the street-market on the oceanside edge of town. Look for a yellow building with blue trim and a terrace with umbrellas. Worth looking for. This great, honest little restaurant harks back to the original, uncommercialized "lobster vil lage" before it got its capital letters and written menus. Open since August, 2002, it's owned by an active fisherman, who serves (as much as weather permits) fresh-caught local lobsters and genuine "daily catch" with standard sides — superb frijoles, red rice, real melted butter — and that's all. The first-course ceviche, when available, is astonishingly flavorful with fish caught that very morning; in harsher weather, a hearty, warming fish chowder substitutes. Breaking from Puerto Nuevo tradition, when the lobster is fresh caught it's simply split and grilled, not lardfried first, and all the better for it. Some staffers are bilingual. Open brunch through dinner. No reservations, cash only. Low moderate. — N.W. (11/02)

It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions, Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. At night, the Nobel Drive branch features a view of the shining Mormon cathedral. ### **Fear Not**

An unimportant line in the mouth of the most minor character can be an auditory delight.

et us begin by agreeing that *Intolerable Cruelty* looks to be the Coen brothers film with the widest, the broadest, the massiest appeal to date, or in the common phrase their "most accessible." Two glamorous

A-list movie stars of opposite sexes, George Clooney and Catherine Zeta-Jones, looking their respective bests,

sugar-cured and honey-glazed, and none of the Coen "regulars" - no McDormand, no Goodman, no Turturro, no Polito, no Buscemi (but instead the unsuitable girlfriend who was in charge of sprucing up Buscemi in Terry Zwigoff's Ghost World, Stacey Travis). True, the Coens had worked with Clooney in O Brother, Where Art Thou?, albeit not looking his best, and also with Billy Bob Thornton, a supporting player here, in The Man Who Wasn't There. But these were still "specialty" items (bluegrass and blackand-white, in that order) in limited release. Intolerable Cruelty is their first "wide" one, or anyway their "widest" one: literally their most accessible in the proper sense of easiest to get at.

And what were we to make of the fact that Joel and Ethan are now sharing the screenwriting credit with a couple of other guys? (Robert Ramsey and Matthew Stone by name, co-writers of the Eddie Murphy and Martin

Lawrence comedy, *Life*, as well as the Dave Barry literary adaptation, *Big Trouble*.) Had they at last gone straight? gone

soft? gone safe? Had they given up the good fight in pursuit of the brass ring?

That such questions can be posed at all merely points up the increased riskiness of the venture: the initial risk of alienating their hardy band of loyalists, their inner core of initiates, and the added risk of failing, at the same time, to win over new converts, to enlist the squares. The questions could profitably be turned around on the hardy band. Would we (for I count myself a member) begrudge the Coens a little commercial prosperity? More pointedly, do we want them all to ourselves or do we want to share them? A week after Arnold Schwarzenegger can get himself elected governor of California may seem a bad time to ex-



press any hopes for the intelligence of the general public, but then again it may be a good time to express the need for it. If the Coens want to volunteer for missionary duty among the heathens, they have my best wishes.

But let's now try to quiet some of the rumbling questions. As Hollywoody as this might look on the surface, or from the outside, it remains no less subversive from within — not as directly and explicitly anti-Hollywood as *Barton Fink*, without a doubt, but nor as obliquely and metaphorically as *Fargo*, *The Hudsucker Proxy*, or *The Big Lebowski*. The setting of this cold hard look at the divorce racket — the reduction of marital relationships,

mutual alliances, common bonds, to cold hard cash — is specifically Tinsel Town and its mansions, its swimming pools, its health spas, its supper clubs, its nearby playgrounds, even though only one of the litigants has an actual toehold in show business: producer of the daytime soap, *The Sands of Time*. And Clooney, as the superstar

of divorce attorneys, a sort of renovated Marvin Mitchelson, can scarcely be accused of inciting the swooners. He consents, for the occasion, not to ride on his good looks, but rather to deride them. Our first sight of him comes in the dentist's chair, nothing but blue-spotlit teeth, as fully exposed as a skull's, and these will develop into a narcissistic fetish equivalent to his pomaded hair in O Brother: running his tongue appreciatively over the ivories, checking their reflection in the soup spoon at a restaurant, practicing his smile in the bathroom mirror. Nothing detracts from manly good looks as much as a man's consciousness of them. Zeta-Jones, as the serial gold-digger, can match her co-star's vanity but not his energy, thus adding frigidity, aloofness, and complacency to her list of attractions. A perfect pair, these two, in the blind eyes of justice. I might accept comparisons to the screwball comedies of Howard Hawks if, in addition to the rapid-fire delivery

of dialogue, someone would point out to me a Hawksian romantic couple who take turns hiring a hit man to do away with one another. ("She won't suffer, will she?" "Not unless you pay extra.") The traditional Happy Ending could seem truly happy only to viewers who hadn't been paying attention.

A more pressing, a more serious, question for Coen-ites ought to have arisen not from any apparent red flags around the present project, but from the palpable enervation and diffuseness of their last one, The Man Who Wasn't There. The answer: fear not. Intolerable Cruelty is unflaggingly speedy, snappy, fresh, and funny and all this in spite of the interruptions from broken splices at the end of every reel during the promo screening. (A commonplace joke, like the divorce lawyer who cries at weddings, leaps out at you as the glaring exception.) Too, it is as tightly constructed as any Coen film before The Big Lebowski, the point at which they started to overload and overstuff. Perhaps significantly, this project in some form has been around awhile. I can remember thinking that Shawn Colvin's version of "Viva Las Vegas" behind the closing credits of Lebowski was either a vestige of it or a presage of it — I can no longer remember which. (Whatever became, while I'm on the subject, of their WWII film with Brad Pitt?) In either case, I had already gotten wind of it as long ago as 1997, when I understood it to be about a convention of divorce lawyers in (where better?) Las Vegas. As it stands now, it is not as narrowly focussed as all that, but it is narrowly focussed nonetheless, homing in on the whole culture of divorce, a world unto itself, a total way of life, with its lore and legend, its luminaries and lesser lights, its legion of interchangeable face-lifted and liposuctioned ex-wives (the Stepford exes), even, you bet, its annual Vegas convention for the National Organization of Matrimonial Attorneys Nationwide: "Let N.O.M.A.N. put asunder."

Besides its fully sealed-off and fleshed-out universe, the film is meticulously worked out in other ways as well, setting it miles apart from the standard Hollywood comedy that sees its job as rounding up a high concept and an SNL alum and then relaxing. The Coens bring all their art to even the lightest and slightest of material: an eye as exact as Hitchcock's, an ear

as attuned as that of Preston Sturges. It would be fair to say that by the time they get through with it, their material never really seems very light or slight. Apart from their natural gravitation toward darkness, it's simply too laden with ingenuities.

The names alone will give you a taste: Miles Massey, Donovan Donaly, Rex Rexroth (alliteration abounds), Howard Drexler Doyle, Freddy Bender, Gus Petch (the obligatory seedy P.I.), Wheezy Joe, and, not least, Heinz, the Baron Krauss von Espy. An unimportant line in the mouth of the most minor character can be an auditory delight: "He manufactures staples and industrial brad tacks." An innocent question, from client to counsel, as to whether the latter has ever "sat before" the presiding judge, will set in motion a verbal merry-goround more dizzying, and yet more firmly anchored, than Abbott-and-Costello's "Who's on first?" And then there's the nautically-themed marital vows ("through gale or doldrums... be it first-class or steerage") recited by a guitar-strumming minstrel minister. Or the Scottish-accented ceremony at a wedding chapel off the Vegas Strip called the Wee Kirk o' the Heather

("Air ye rentin' kilts?"), complete with bagpipe rendition of "Bridge over Troubled Water." It goes on and on, and never slacks off.

However aware we may be of the eye and the ear, it is other body parts that form the central motifs of the film. (The Coen brothers always offer motifs.) First, the teeth: not only Clooney's dazzling choppers, but the bared fangs of several snappish pooches (one of them in urgent need of "Milk Bones, hard crunchy bones for the teeth"), plus some pertinent reminders of their function (Clooney: "I assume you're a carnivore." Zeta-Jones: "I eat men like you for breakfast"). And second, the ass, as in "I'm mortgaged up to my heinie," but also discreetly concealed in longer words, as in the scheduled keynote speech at the Vegas convention, "Nailing Your Spouse's Assets," or in the surname of the speaker himself, Massey: "The Massey pre-nup has never been pen-etrated." Without a pre-nup, needless to say, but let's say it anyway, you'd be "naked" and "exposed," humiliating in itself, but so much more vulnerable to teeth, too. Whose teeth are in whose ass is the heart of the film, if it has a heart.

Those motifs, and heaven knows what others, await further exploration on my compulsory second viewing.

American Splendor — A chewable bone thrown to the famished fans of Ghost World, with a protagonist closely related to the latter's Steve Buscemi in his marginal existence, his menial job, his obliviousness or out-and-out resistance to fashion, his patronage of yard sales, his esoteric record collection, his congenital negativity. One difference, of course, is that the present protagonist is an actual living person, one Harvey Pekar, a 365-days-a-year sourpuss, sorehead, and bellyacher ("I don't know how to be positive"), and a lifelong file clerk at a V.A. hospital in Cleveland, who eventually became the protagonist of a series of autobiographical underground comics also titled American Splendor (illustrated by various hands, starting with R. Crumb), and who by that avenue became the sometime foil of David Letterman and the full-time husband of one Joyce Brabner, a "selfdiagnosed anemic" and all-around hypochondriac, who began as a fan of the comics and wound up as a character in them and a collaborator on them. Another difference from the Buscemi character is that this one, center-stage the entire time, must carry the whole load by himself. And even though Paul Giamatti, the very epitome of a supporting player, relishes his chance at a lead, he's a bit of a one-note, a bit of a stickler about always staying "in character." The danger of him thus seeming to be putting on an act is that he seems to be insinuating that Pekar too is putting on an act. Our respect for the man teeters in the balance. In covering the complete biographical arc at one sitting, the film inevitably deviates from the amorphous daily minutiae in which the comic books wallow. It comes to resemble instead a conventional American success story however modest or ironic or parodistic a one — with a suspiciously rosy ending after a climactic battle against cancer. The infiltration of the action with other likenesses of the hero — the real Harvey Pekar behind the scenes and in voice-over, the real Pekar in archival clips from the Letterman show (major exception: his illtempered meltdown on the air must be reenacted by Giamatti and a silhouetted stand-

in for Letterman), along with assorted



Ossie Davis, Jr., sounding new depths of gravity, has an easier access to absurdity than has the heavily made-up and heavily imitative Bruce Campbell: what's the difference between playing Elvis and playing an Elvis impersonator? The mock-horror element is very much the element of director Don Coscarelli (the Phantasm series); the mock-heroic element proves to be more of a reach. 2003.

Casa de los Babys — The name of the movie is the name of a Mexican resort hotelcum-hospital where half a dozen gringas await their turn to adopt native newborns; more bluntly, where the haves take from the have-nots. Or still more bluntly, where the Left-leaning John Sayles can show off some of his right thinking (note the lowercase "r"), to say nothing of some of his falsesounding dialogue. At a mere hour and a half, it is underdeveloped by Sayles's latterday standards, yet each of the principals (Maggie Gyllenhaal, Daryl Hannah, Marcia Gay Harden, Susan Lynch, Mary Steenburgen, Lili Taylor), if they don't all get a turn to adopt, do get a turn to act.

**Un Chien Andalou** — The surrealist fashion plate, jointly made by Salvador Dali and Luis Buñuel (his first movie, and already several of his staples are on display: insects, donkeys, razor blades, comical clergymen). Very exciting for the dream logic that allows a portion of a scene to change course while the remainder of the scene continues on as before; undoubtedly

less shocking now than it was in 1928, but still rude and hurtful to anyone who is especially touchy about eyeballs, armpits, and other such sensitive spots; short enough and full enough to be viewed over and over without ever growing weary.

Cold Creek Manor — If Mike Figgis, following his string of digital-video experiments, wanted simply to prove he could still make a regular movie, then the present project might be termed a success. It could hardly be more "regular," an obvious and overwrought thriller about a New York family (Dennis Quaid, Sharon Stone, and kids), in search of tranquillity, who, for a song, pick up a repossessed upstate mansion and all its belongings. 

Dirty Pretty Things - The bicontinentalBritish filmmaker Stephen Frears returns to the milieu of his Sammy and Rosie Get Laid and My Beautiful Laundrette — the London melting pot, but this time in the grimmer mood of a Thirties-style social drama (the Warners studio, most typically), with a rough, raw, skinned-knuckle image and a crowding, collaring, buttonholing camera. The puckered-browed protagonist (Chiwetel Ejiofor) is a Nigerian illegal who works days as a cab driver — his training in his homeland as a doctor obliges him to examine and treat his fellow cabbies for VD — and works nights as a hotel desk clerk. (He sleeps never.) In the latter capacity, a ghastly discovery in an overflowing toilet on the fifth floor — a breath-stopping scene — leads him down a trail into a black-market trade in internal organs and forged passports: or, if you prefer, into an overwrought metaphor for the plight of the illegal. There is also a girl in the picture, a Turkish Muslim (Audrey Tautou) who works in the hotel as a chambermaid and has a huge crush on the hero. The mixed chorus of immigrants – prominently Spanish, Chinese, and Russian in addition to the nationalities already mentioned — affords an interesting framework, but the fill-in is luridly melodramatized and sentimentalized, as if the only answer to xenophobia were an equally rabid xenophilia. The plaintiveness of the two principals stands unsurpassed on the streets of London since Broken Blossoms and the cartoonish menace of the immigration cops and the swinish sweatshop boss is unsurpassed since Dickens. Donnie Darko — Dark comedy, photographically as much as temperamentally, about a disturbed adolescent (Jake Gyllenhaal of October Sky) who has an imaginary friend in a demonic bunny suit giving him mischief-making orders. Lost in Translation — Sofia Coppola's sophomore effort marks an advance over The Virgin Suicides: a phlegmatic comedy about two American outsiders who fall into an ill-defined relationship in Tokyo, a bond forged of loneliness and misery between an over-the-hill Hollywood action star (a sadsack Bill Murray, who surely should have been written as an over-the-hill comedy star), in town to collect a cool two million for a series of whisky ads, and a neglected young wife (the seductively throaty Scarlett Johansson), who spends a lot of time lolling around her hotel room in transparent pink

(the dependably dreadful Giovanni Ribisi) busies himself with work. The "satirical" touch tends to be lighter this time, with perhaps a few exceptions: the suspected anorexic blond starlet (with so many to choose from, couldn't a better fit have been found for this role than the robust Anna Faris?), the tutti-frutti television host misleadingly labelled "the Johnny Carson of Japan," the S&M call girl ("Lip my stocking!"), and the imported guitar-andvocal lounge act billed as "Sausalito." Truly on the lighter side, however, there are large numbers of points scored, even if easy ones, with the advertising campaign ("For relaxing times, make it Suntori time"), the language difficulties, the faxes and FedExes and phone calls from the all-business wife in California, the exercise machine, the local cuisine, and the inevitable karaoke bar (Murray reverting to SNL form for his soupladle renditions of Elvis Costello's "Peace, Love, and Understanding" and Roxy Music's "More Than This"). And the touristing in and around Tokyo is pleasantly relaxed. Coppola's uncertain visual style, vacillating between a fussy precision and a fumbling offhandedness, could never be mistaken for her father's. 



Frisking and frolicking to keep pace are Alison Lohman as the teenage daughter he never knew he had, and Sam Rockwell as his loosey-goosey partner in crime. It would all be intolerably annoying except that director Ridley Scott, while exercising no control over his actors, keeps a close watch on their surroundings, playing tirelessly with light and shadow, picking out microscopic details, catching reflections in glass, and generally giving you a lot to look at apart from the three overactors. (He gives you a lot to listen to as well: a wall-to-wall songtrack heavy on Sinatra and his peers.) Just as Unforgiven was an act of penance for the body counts in his Sergio Leone spaghetti Westerns as well as in his self-directed imitation Leones (High Plains Drifter, The Outlaw Josey Wales, Pale Rider), this can be viewed as an act of penance for the lone-wolf vigilantism of his Dirty Harry urban shoot-'em-ups: a kind of cleansed Harry. (There is no room here for Eastwood the actor, standing aside for the "liberal" casting of Sean Penn and Tim

Robbins, and their highly emotional, tearful, unstoical, un-Eastwoody histrionics.) Although formulated as a murder mystery, it is not narrowly focussed on the investigation, but divides its time more or less evenly among three main characters, and expands continuously into the specific milieu, the complex personal relationships, the affected and ongoing lives, in fact life in general, life with a capital "L." All throughout, it sustains a tone of lamentation, underscored by the churchy musical theme composed by Eastwood himself (albeit orchestrated by his trusted collaborator, Lennie Niehaus). The retributive anger never supplants the sorrow; the release never comes. Admittedly, the outcome of the case depends upon a fortuitous coincidence that reeks of mystery-making for its own sake: a previously unrevealed second murder on the same night as the first. Yet the solution to the original murder is not overly tricksy, is perhaps even overly obvious; and the mood of the moment in any case is not one of parlor games and "gotcha." The honest the aggrieved — the penitent emotionalism of the film makes up for either the fortuitousness or the obviousness, as necessary. Kevin Bacon, Laurence Fishburne, Laura Linney, Marcia Gay

Once upon a Time in Mexico — It is one of the mysteries of cinema: the production can be slick as a hockey rink, the camera movements agile and athletic, the angles exalting, the action unrelenting, the overall direction giddy with the joy of creation, and still the movie can be stupefyingly dull. This second sequel to El Maricahi, colloquially billed as "A Robert Rodriguez Flick," as well as "Shot, Chopped, and Scored by Robert Rodriguez," in addition to simply "Written and Directed by Robert Rodriguez," serves to illustrate, if not illuminate, the mystery. No doubt the shooter, chopper, scorer, writer, and director has come a long way since the hand-crafted crudities of Mariachi, and vet the persistent dullness indicates that the mileage has been piled up in a tight spiral around a fixed point. No doubt, too, he has accomplished exactly what he set out to do in this self-consciously, tongue-in-cheekily mythologizing pageant. ("That," as a line in the script puts it, "is truly unbelievable.") No doubt he himself finds a Hong Kong action film by John Woo to be a completely satisfying aesthetic experience, and no doubt he would feel flattered to be included in the same sentence. One is tempted, then, to try to explain away the mystery by the absence of what once would have been called the human element: back before, that is, every fledgling filmmaker had to add Joseph Campbell's The Hero with a Thousand Faces to his basic library, and mere heroes began to be crowded out by superheroes, one-man armies, instant legends, franchises. One needn't be a believer in Pure Cinema though, to suspect there's more to it than just the total absence of humanity. Topmost among the director's glaring limitations is his propensity, like a muscle-bound headhunting prizefighter, to think in terms of one shot at a time: no combinations, no strategy, no pacing. 

Pickup on South Street — A two-bit pickpocket unwittingly picks his way into the middle of a Soviet spy ring. One of Samuel Fuller's higher-profile productions (20th Century-Fox, Richard Widmark, Jean Peters), much admired by the French, even imitated by Bresson, with added philosophy, in Pickpocket. The McCarthy-era melodramatics are pretty crude, but the details of the hero's marginal existence are flavorful, and the director's in-your-face style packs plenty of punch. Memorable character bit by Thelma Ritter as a withered old raisin on the underworld grapevine. 1953.

Pirates of the Caribbean: The Curse of the Black Pearl — Now that the "ride" — as in "wild ride," "thrill ride," "rollercoaster ride" — seems to be an accepted film category, if not quite a genre, it makes sense that a film would be modelled

after, or at least named after, an actual

amusement-park ride. But Pirates - not the first Disney movie to bring to the screen a Disneyland attraction, if you count *The* Country Bears — is more of a long ride than any other kind of ride, a two-and-a-quarter-hour kiddie film, loud and broad, about ratchet-voiced, pasteboard pirates who turn out, to the detriment of the sword-crossing scenes, to be really the ghosts of pirates. (Trying to kill the already dead is a tedious business.) The visual effects of these pirates turning from flesh to bones as they pass in and out of moonlight are marvelous to behold, as is the effect of their stealthy advance on foot across the ocean floor. But director Gore Verbinski, fresh off the throatclutching frights of The Ring, cannot hope with this one to scare a five-year-old. Orlando Bloom, on the team of humans, looks as stoutheartedly heroic as in the Lord of the Rings films; and Keira Knightley nimbly makes the leap from proletarian jock in Bend It Like Beckham to cosseted, corseted aristocrat: or in more practical terms, from little "indie" to high-stakes blockbuster. And Johnny Depp, with raccoonish rings of mascara around his eyes and a perpetual Dean Martin slur in his speech, lets you know in every way possible that he's not taking any of this seriously, other than his paycheck. The Princess Bride — Rob Reiner, who's said to have been wanting to make a movie of the William Goldman novel for many more years than he'd actually been a moviemaker, is not at this point a good enough director to cover up for a not good enough idea: he's still tied too tightly to the TV sitcom sensibility (acquired no doubt in his years as an actor on All in the Family), all the way down to the clunking closeup of whoever happens to be talking at the moment. In fairness he does seem to keep on trying to do something a little different, only he is doing something less different here than he seems to think. The possibilities of the tongue-in-cheek swashbuckling adventure have been pretty thoroughly mapped out in such things as, coming forwards in time, The Great Race, Richard Lester's The Three (and Four) Musketeers, Richard Quine's The Prisoner of Zenda, Flash Gordon, and the Indiana Jones films. And the Errol Flynn-Douglas Fairbanks prototypes never had their tongues far from their cheeks in the first place. But forget all that now, if you possibly can, as you are guided again to The Shrieking Eels and The Cliffs of Insanity and The Fire Swamp, with its St. Bernard-sized rats, and The Pit of Despair and so on (only

the names are different), to be regaled not so much by the actual spectacle of any of these sights as by the choking facetiousness of your tour-guide. This attitude of indulgent superiority is evidently supposed to coat the thing with a layer of "adultness." And for a second coat into the bargain, there is a present-day framing device whereby a horribly made-up and costumed grand-dad (Peter Falk) "reads" the story we are seeing to a precocious sitcom kid in his sickbed: a soft-sell pitch for literature (the television of yore) that had been done before, and better, in The Neverending Story. Winks and eyerolls notwithstanding, however, The Princess Bride remains obstinately a movie for children. There is no harm in that. But there is not a lot else in it either. **School of Rock** — An imposter substitute teacher, and local laughingstock rocker, instructs a class of grade-schoolers in What He Knows: rock-and-roll, history and practice. The participation of director Richard Linklater (Slacker, etc.) and screenwriter Mike White (The Good Girl, etc. ) might raise expectations slightly, and similarly raise the results: head of the class of

boneheads. Their plunge into the commercial mainstream - for a sort of Adam Sandler movie sans Adam Sandler has left them relatively unbefouled, maybe with just a faint scent of oil and sewage. A smarty-pants answer to things like Mr. Holland's Opus and Music of the Heart, the movie nevertheless boasts the "sweetness" for which Sandler is abundantly famous and grudgingly indulged. The hero does end up teaching something, and of course learning something himself: a feelgood movie, but a feel-cool, too. Jack Black, in his plummiest role to date, throws himself into it body if not soul. Seabiscuit — Writer-director Gary Ross runs through the storied career of the toosmall racehorse with the too-big jockey, blind in one eye to boot. In this

treatment — a simple horse story amplified into a social history — the nag must lug the additional weight of the aggregate Little Guy and the collective American Dream. Although these sentimentalities are to a large extent true to the horse's press clippings at the time, the practical result is that the filmmaker picks up the story too far back — it will be nearly an hour before the title figure makes his grand entrance from a fog bank — and goes to inordinate lengths to explain to the modern-day viewer the meaning of such things as the Triumph of Industry, the Closing of the Frontier, Prohibition, the Stock Market Crash, and the Great Depression: "A great national migration began," blah blah. (The authoritative voice of the narrator, complete with PBS credentials, is that of historian David McCullough.) At the more intimate level, Ross feels obliged to point out repeatedly in the dialogue, lest anyone miss it, how this mishandled and discarded horse mirrors and symbolizes the three damaged men — owner, trainer, rider — who turned him into a winner. The viewer, in particular the old-fashioned viewer to whom the film caters, could be forgiven for feeling a little less enlightened than insulted. And when he reminds himself that Ross's prior credit was Pleasantville, he could be forgiven again for

wondering whether the filmmaker, in his

bland nostalgia and bottled optimism, is not

somehow a prisoner of the antiseptic fantasyland he therein satirized. The races despite an overdose of slow-motion and of blustery billowy Randy Newman music in the mode of *The Natural*, are varied and exciting. And the principals — Jeff Bridges, Chris Cooper, Tobey Maguire as the aforesaid owner, trainer, rider — are uniformly sympathetic in their openly operatically anguished way. But it is left to real-life jockey Gary Stevens to teach the less-is-more lesson (from the Richard Conte School of Acting), a tight-lipped, squarejawed oasis of professional cool and personal dignity. Diane Lane, in the lead role, continues in her Unfaithful vein of forcing every little twitch and tremor of interior life out onto the surface. #### **LEAD STORY**

- According to a September BBC report, police in South Korea are investigating some of the 22,000 complaints made this year by computer gamers that characters and property that they have acquired in such games as "EverQuest" and "Ultima Online" have been stolen by hackers and sold to other gamers to make their own playing more successful. Experts say such theft of "intangibles" should be punishable by law, but the value of the stolen property might be inconsequential, except to those players whose entire lives revolve around a game and for whom the acquisition of a character or property might have involved hundreds of hours of playing.

#### **People Different From Us**

- In September in Pinson, Ala., Joseph Logan, 46, was arrested for assault after watching Alabama's 34-31 football loss to Arkansas on TV. Logan started ranting, slamming doors, and throwing dishes into the sink, and it was at this point that his son, Seth, 20, chose to ask Dad if he would help him buy a car. Dad grabbed a gun, put Seth in a headlock, and fired a bullet near Seth's ear. Said a sheriff's deputy, "I know we take football serious in the South, but that's crossing the line."

#### U.S. Customs Is on the Job!

 In August, U.S. Customs confiscated an SUV being used to smuggle Mexican immigrants into the country, but later admitted that their search of it had overlooked a 13-year-old girl hiding inside; she was discovered 42 hours later. ... In July, Adrian Rodriguez was imprisoned (but released by an appeals court a month later) because Mexican authorities found 33 pounds of marijuana that U.S. Customs had failed to find in a vehicle it had just sold to him at auction. That was the third time recently that someone had bought a vehicle from U.S. Customs that contained overlooked marijuana and for which the purchaser spent some time in prison (in one case, one year) before things were straightened out.

#### **Our Litigious Society**

 Former Ball State University student Andrew Bourne, 23, and his parents filed a lawsuit in

September against the school and the manufacturer of its aluminum football goal posts. Bourne suffered a broken leg and vertebrae when, during a raucous end-zone celebration after a 2001 victory over the University of Toledo, students pulled down the goal posts, hitting Bourne.

- John Clayton III was awarded \$1.5 million by a jury in Greensboro, N.C., in September based on injuries he suffered as a passenger in a car whose driver had to slam on the brakes to avoid a collision. The car Clayton was a passenger in was a police car; he was being brought to the station on an outstanding arrest warrant when the officer-driver hit the brakes. Clayton claimed the sudden stop caused him "back problems."

- Kevin Presland was awarded the equivalent of \$150,000 by a judge in Sydney, Australia, in August because the Hunter Area Health Service psychiatric hospital released him too soon in 1995, after which he killed his brother's fiancée. This was not a lawsuit by the victim's family against the hospital; this was a direct payout to Presland, whose injury was that he was made to suffer temporary prison conditions after his arrest (he was acquitted because of his psychosis), whereas if he had never been released, he would have experienced only psychiatric-hospital conditions.

 Former Kansas City Royals coach Tom Gamboa filed a lawsuit in September against a fan who attacked him during a September 2002 baseball game at U.S. Cellular Field in Chicago. Gamboa also filed a suit against the ballpark's security firm and its concessionaire. Several days after the attack, Gamboa had told the Associated Press. "The fault is with the two people [the fan and his minor son who did it. I'm not one who looks to [spread] blame. It's nobody's fault but the two idiots who did it."

#### **Recent Highway Truck Spills**

 A trailer full of toilet bowls came unhooked and overturned on Interstate 88 near Colesville, N.Y. (June). ... A trailer full of compressed paper and sex toys (including whips, plastic breasts and blow-up dolls) spilled onto the northbound M6 highway near Castle Bromwich, England (June). ... Two tractor-trailers full of honeybees (80 million on Interstate 95 near Titusville, Fla.,

in April, and another measured at 500 beehives of "thousands of bees each" on Interstate 435 near Claycomo, Mo., in June).

#### **Compelling Explanations**

- In an August story about the driving record of U.S. Rep. Bill Janklow of South Dakota (who had just killed a motorcyclist in a collision), the Sioux Falls Argus Leader reported that Janklow's defense (that he had to swerve to avoid another vehicle) was the same one he had used for each of three previous collisions (one swerve was for an animal, not a vehicle), and that in none of the four instances was there any corroborating evidence of the other vehicle or animal.

#### Update

'News of the Weird" reported in December that Inga Kosak had won the first World Extreme Ironing Championship in Munich in September, based on running a course through several stations (e.g., up in trees, in the middle of streams) and ironing a designated garment. An October Wall Street Journal story shows the "sport" as growing in prominence. South African Anton Van De Venter, 27, broke the high-altitude record in August by ironing his national flag at the 20,000-foot summit of Mount Kilimanjaro, while nude, in freezing temperatures (quote: "I came, I saw, I pressed a crease"), and British diver Ian Mitchell sawed through ice in Wisconsin in March and submitted photos of himself in a wet suit "ironing" (with a Black & Decker Quick 'n' Easy) a shirt that was braced against the underside of the ice.

#### Ewwww, Gross!

 A deep-sea research voyage in June, jointly run by Australia and New Zealand scientists, discovered what The Age newspaper called an 1800species "freak show" of bizarre creatures (their condition caused in part by the extreme water pressure, which may be hundreds of times greater than at the surface). Examples include: the fangtooth (teeth, longer than its head, would puncture its brain if not for special tooth sockets); the viperfish (whose head is on a hinge); the coffinfish (with a glowing "sign" on its head to attract prey

and the ability to swallow large quantities of water to avoid predators); a squid with one big eye (for offense) and one small one (for defense); and the snotthead, which was not described.

#### **Give Them Points for "Style"**

 A 17-year-old boy, after receiving a free Krispy Kreme doughnut at an Erie, Pa., store promotion, stepped back in line for another but was refused. According to the Erie Times-News, he returned a few minutes later with a McDonald's sack over his head and asked for a doughnut but was again refused. Then he fell to the floor and flailed his arms and legs, demanding another free doughnut, and was cited by police for disorderly conduct.

"Hey, that guy's wearing mismatched socks too."

My spiritual advisor urges me to pay attention to coincidence. To what end, I'm not sure. I've heard it cryptically remarked that coincidence is God's way of establishing His anonymity. I think what may be meant is that it is His way of maintaining His anonymity, as He's already done a fine job with the basic premise. Just His nine billion names alone makes Him hard to nail. In my experience, coincidence is often of the "Hey, that guy's wearing mismatched socks too" variety. Essentially trivial and meaningless. But once in a while coincidence does seem to demand you pay attention, at least momentarily, to something one might not normally focus upon.

It was like that for me last Friday, visiting the Reuben H. Fleet theater's exhibition (visiting from San Francisco) on the nature of memory. In recent weeks I had been re-reading Anthony Burgess's Earthly Powers, certainly one of the best novels of the last century. And while it is about many things, it is about nothing so much as the nature of memory. Memory's suspicious nature, really. The novel, I read somewhere, was nearly called Confabulations.

It is worth a visit to Balboa Park for this one. Bemusing is the word that comes to mind, and one I never use. Disturbing is a word that follows not far behind. At the entrance to the exhibit are small displays, like miniature theaters complete with miniature velvet curtains. One is to blindly reach one's hand past the curtain and identify common objects by touch. Inside might be a telephone receiver, a pair of eyeglasses, or a spool of varn. I was disheartened at how many I misidentified (telephone receiver as furniture coaster?); I blamed it all on San Francisco, where Tony Bennett left his heart and I, coincidentally, left my memory in 1969.

Another banner nearby reads, "What is your oldest memory? How old were you? Have you or others told the memory many times? How do you know it's accurate? Write your earliest memory in the journal."

A journal and writing implement are provided. The book contained a large number of entries, seemingly by children, considering handwriting and spelling. But not so. "I remember a dream in which large dinosaurs and reptilian figures destroyed our house. My dad chased them away in the dream. Or, "I can remember being in the bathroom. I would stand on the toilet and jump off. I would then start flying around the bathroom. My Mom would call me and I would have to stop. I was three years old." And this one, "I remember when my sisters didn't want me in the room when they were playing babies. They tied a doll's head to the door that looked real. The doll's hair was cut off and it had weird eyes. I remember being scared and my Mom getting mad at them for it." Stacey signed this last one, aged 20, the youngest contributor I saw, though I didn't look at them all.

Also of interest here is a longish quote from Jean Piaget, a recognized expert on the learning process in children, among other things. "One of my first memories would date, if it were true, from my second year. I can still see most clearly a scene in which I believed until I was about 15. I was sitting in my pram which my nurse was pushing in the Champs Elysee...

Piaget goes on to describe an attempted kidnapping of his toddler self and a courageous and successful struggle on the part of the nurse to rout the would-be felon. As an adult, Piaget still saw the arrival of a caped policeman with a white baton. The nurse was injured, but the award of a wristwatch commemorated her heroism. Years later, when the nurse joined the Salvation Army and wanted to confess her past faults, she admitted the episode was made up from whole cloth. Piaget carried a false memory of a memory for a long time, undistinguishable from the genuine article.

This I recognized, unfortunately, as precisely the nature of my imprecise memories. For example, yes, I was at the Rolling Stones concert at Altamont, California, in 1969; but no, I did not perform there as Brian Jones's replacement as I had convinced myself with the aid of mescaline, alcohol, and a decade of hibernating in the 1970s.

At the museum exhibit, you will find a jukebox quiz station. This I found discouraging as well. Once I prided myself on knowing that, say, Al Kooper was a member of the Royal Teens, who recorded the single "Short Shorts" and that Kooper penned the song "This Diamond Ring" for Gary Lewis and the Playboys. But the museum's jukebox was asking me if Duran Duran or Britney Spears recorded a few bars of music, and I couldn't tell you. I lump both performers together as "new crap," though there are 20 years between them.

And getting back to those earliest memories, why are so many of them tied to fearsome imagery? I know mine are. Fear, memory, dreams, and the learning process seem to be linked — some of it quite understandable in a hand-on-a-hot-stove kind of way. But other bits of it are wonderfully mysterious. Linking creativity with dreams is not much of a reach, nor is it particularly original; but I wonder if other writers at the task of fiction would compare the enterprise, as I do, with a kind of lucid dreaming. And fear seems to be at the bottom of so much of human experience — and married to memory, to boot. If memory can be so suspect, are we to take it by extension that fear can be largely an illusory proposition as well? It's an optimistic idea.

I can't remember the last time I had a genuinely optimistic idea.
