Ribbon of Dorian Gray Last year, as the invasion of Iraq wound down and President George W. Bush and his party flew into Coronado for his well-remembered "Mission Accomplished" speech aboard the carrier Abraham Lin-

coln, county politicos rushed to tie a giant yellow ribbon and bow around the central tower of the county administration building on Harbor Drive. "We want this to be the first thing that they see," county supervisor Dianne Jacob told reporters. "We're sending a very strong message that we love you, we appreciate you, and thank you for your service to our country." Her colleague Greg Cox added that he had told the president about the ribbon, paid for by a \$15,000 donation from the Sycuan Casino, during a brief conversation after his arrival at North Island. "He said he thought it was a great effort," Cox was quoted as saying. "He appreciated that." In order to get a crane in time for Bush's arrival, contractor Tom Flynn told the Union-Tribune, a little pressure had to be applied. "It was something along the lines of, 'Oh, no problem. We'll just call the White House and have them tell the president we can't get the bow up in time, and he'll be disappointed.' They said, 'Okay, okay.' " Ever since, the ribbon has remained tied to the building, but more passersby are complaining that it needs to be cleaned up or replaced. "It's extremely dirty and weather-worn," observes one county worker who looks up at the decoration every day on the way to work. "It's not really yellow anymore. More like dirty gray or sickening green or blackstreaked something else. Not a very patriotic way to honor our troops." Calls to various county offices regarding the ribbon's derelict condition went unreturned as of press time.

Black's mark San Diego's city library commission has been hit by some political fallout from the mayor's race. Laurie Black, an active Democrat who is a Kerry delegate at this summer's national convention in Boston, has reportedly received word she won't be reappointed by Mayor Dick Murphy to another four-year term. City- hall insiders say it has something to do with the Murphy camp's pique over Black's endorsement of retired banker Peter Q. Davis over Murphy during March's mayoral primary campaign. The fate of another Davis supporter, Mary Ann Pintar, an ex-aide to former mayor Susan Golding, is also hanging in the balance ... San Diego's ethics commission wants to stop using the legal services of the city attorney's office and instead hire outside counsel. Skeptics note that the move coincides with the impending departure of city attorney Casey Gwinn and the possible election of Michael Aguirre, viewed as not so friendly to the downtown establishment, as his successor. Three years ago, when civic watchdog Mel Shapiro urged that an independent attorney be hired, the powers that be were opposed. "Gwinn's Public Integrity Section has not done its job - that's why we need an ethics commission." Responded Gwinn in an e-mail to Shapiro: "The fact that we did not file charges against a councilmember should not cause you to attack the character of my staff members." Meanwhile, city officials say they will soon begin requiring electronic filing of campaign finance disclosure information.

Shrinkage Look for another round of fireworks at next week's San Diego school district board meeting as superintendent Alan Bersin attempts to shutter more of the district's schools. "Historic and forecasted enrollment decline, particularly at the elementary level, has led to a situation where there is a potential to close a number of small elementary schools," says a Bersin briefing for the June 8 meeting. "Concurrently the district is experiencing a shortfall in its unrestricted budget. Closure of small schools would allow the redirection of unrestricted funding to other district needs." Downsides of the move, according to the report, include \$60,000 per school in teacher relocation costs and the accelerated flight of students from the district's remaining schools. That would happen "if families from closed schools choose charter, private, or out-of-district schools rather than transfer to their new neighborhood school." The memo attributes the enrollment fall-off - almost 6000 kindergarten through fifth-grade students in this school year alone - to a "decline in births" since the "early-mid 1990s" and "more recently [to] significant increases in the area housing costs." In choosing the schools to close, the report says, such criteria as "enrollment trends" and "site characteristics" - including whether the school is close to freeways, "high-pressure underground gas lines" or "known fault lines or former landfills"were used. "Initial closure recommendations" for the school year beginning in 2005 include Rolando Park Elementary, Crown Point Elementary, and Barnard Elementary in Point Loma. If Rolando Park is closed, the report concludes, families may "choose to enroll in the nearby Rolando Elementary School in the La Mesa-Spring Valley School District rather than continue in a district school located farther away (Carver, Clay) or with lower achievement levels (Darnall charter)." Each school closed saves the district \$360,000 a year, the report concludes, and money might even be made by turning the sites over to local real estate developers for commercial uses.

How Is the Coaster Doing?

or nine years, the Coaster ran 100 feet from Mitchell Reiss's bedroom window in Carlsbad. Two months ago, Reiss

moved from his proximity to the Poinsettia station to the South Bay "to get as far away from the Coaster as possible." The noise drove him away, as well as "other nuisances" from the trains' headlights and gathering passengers. Despite his entreaties to the North County Transit District for relief, officials continually told Reiss there was no noise pollution at the wo months ago, Reiss In his letter, Reiss charges that since 1996 the Union-Tribune has reprinted glowing accounts of the Coaster's performance by the North County Transit District and the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG). As the most recent example, he cites the March 20 story by Lola Sherman titled "Coaster Trains Growing Along with Ridership." In its third parager tallies for the Coaster, never published in the Union-Tribune." The link to this data (http://cart.sandag. $cog.ca.us\pcp\guest.asp.)$ leads Reiss to the average number of daily Coaster passengers between 1996 to 2003 (2004's averages are not yet available). In a simple table, he displays the average daily passengers from a low of 2793 in 1996 to a high of 5802 in 2003.

The Union-Tribune seems to have understated the 2003 figures in the article: 4500 average daily passengers versus the transit district's 5802. But in his letter, Reiss argues that the real problem comes from the paper *repeating* (from statements made by the transit district and the association of governments) daily passenger totals rather than writes that San Marcos councilman Mike Preston "inadvertently...let the cat out of the bag" by suggesting why the more "accurate" numbers aren't on the site.

From the February issue of the Union-Tribune, Reiss quotes, "Coasters carry more than 5600 passengers a day, San Marcos Councilman Mike Preston noted at a meeting of the [North County Transit District Board of Directors] monitoring committee yesterday. But he said those figures include everyone boarding in both directions, so probably only half that number of separate individuals rides the train daily."

Returning to his own commentary, Reiss asks, "Are the directors of NCTB really ues Reiss. "They throw around the biggest numbers they can, as shown above, and leave it to the reader to divine the distinction between a passenger and a person. Sometimes they go too far. An editorial advocating \$18 million in fixes for the system (May 20, 1999) contained this statement: 'Almost 5000 commuters now use the Coaster. That's a lot of cars that are no longer traveling on Interstate 5.' "

In Reiss's next paragraph, he wraps up his argument: "The Coaster load figures as reported in the *Union-Tribune* have been systematically camouflaged by a factor of 2 since the Coaster went into service. The reality is that in 2003 (the Coaster's best year) less than 2900 people took the 260,000 cars Caltrans says go through the I-5/805 merge every weekday. He remembers a story the *Union-Tribune* ran on February 20 of this year, titled "I-5/805 Merge Among Nation's Most Clogged." Nowhere in the article, he writes, was the alleviating effect of the Coaster mentioned.

Thus, Reiss argues in the letter's conclusion, "The Coaster is not a solution to the County's transportation problems. It's not a partial solution. It's not even a potential solution." And, for that reason, he thinks the Coaster is a waste of money, especially when that money might be spent in better ways.

But in a phone interview, Garry Bonelli, director of communications for the San Diego Association of Governments, says that only lack of parking in the I-5 corridor is preventing the Coaster from "tripling the number of its riders." He mentions 6000 as the number of passengers the line now serves but acknowledges that number to be the total of south- and northbound commuters.

Bonelli remembers that the Coaster project got started in 1995 with an original investment of \$243 million, \$90 million of that from TransNet funds from a halfcent sales tax approved in 1987. According to the North County Transit District website (www.gonctd.com), in fiscal year 2003, the rail line's operating budget had total expenses of \$58.5 million. Fiscal year 2004's expenses are projected to be \$61.9 million.

Of the Coaster's \$61 million revenues for 2003 (\$62.9 million estimated for 2004), \$12,916,070 came from passenger fares. Most of the rail's remaining revenues came from the state Transportation Development Act tax (\$27.6 million) and the TransNet tax (\$4,118,870 million).

The fate of the TransNet tax is currently deadlocked at the association of governments. The tax is scheduled to expire in March 2008 but will be eligible for extension approval in this November's election. According to a March 11, 2004, Union-Tribune article by Jeff Ristine continued on page 15

Reiss learned everything he could about the Coaster, and his preoccupation convinced him that the rail line is bad for taxpayers and bad for San Diego County commuters. He made his case in a late-February letter to the editor to the *San Diego Union-Tribune*. At 2500-plus words, his statement was long for a letter; the *Union-Tribune* declined to publish any part of it. graph, the article states, "Ridership is averaging 5122 passengers on weekdays, up from 4500 at this time last year." The story touts the Coaster's acquisition of six new \$2 million coaches to handle the increase; it also quotes North County Transit District spokesman Tom Kelleher as saying that now "every coach and locomotive is in service."

"Deeply embedded on the SANDAG website," writes Reiss, "are the actual passenmore specific data on northbound and southbound riders. If the numbers for 2003 are checked on the "deeply embedded SANDAG website," the figures indicate 2929 northbound passengers and 2873 southbound passengers.

Even 4500 average daily passengers, though lower than the website's number, indicates greater Coaster success than the 2929 northbound and 2873 southbound passengers posted. Reiss unaware that the vast majority of people who take the Coaster are, and have always been, round-trip commuters?" Perhaps "this is the first time an NCTD or SANDAG official has publicly revealed this complicated insight, or...it's the first time the *Union-Tribune* has seen fit to print it.

"The Union-Tribune, following NCTD's lead, has been engaged in word games for close to a decade," contintheir cars off the freeway and rode the Coaster instead."

The May 20, 1999, Union-Tribune editorial also noted that without the "almost 5000 commuters now [using] the Coaster," the 7:00 to 8:00 a.m. backup of traffic to Encinitas on I-5 would extend up to Carlsbad. But Reiss thinks that the true figure of "less than 2900 people [taking] their cars off the freeway" is a "drop in the bucket," especially in light of

'But the numbers quoted for Phoenix are a few years old," complains Lisa Briggs,

executive director of the taxpayers association. Similarly, when DeMaio compared certain San Diego spending with Baltimore and Atlanta, the numbers for those cities were somewhat askew, she charges. In some cases, the institute

"is not doing thorough research, has not footnoted things," says Mitch Mitchell, vice president of the chamber.

DeMaio strongly denies that any of these numbers are inaccurate or the comparisons invidious. But even if the Phoenix numbers are somewhat out of date, San Diego's mayor and council are still spending far too much. If the Atlanta and Baltimore numbers are a bit off, that is hardly a venal sin: there is no such thing as an apples-

to-apples comparison among cities. Also, San Diego government has denied information to DeMaio and complained when he went directly to city employees for reform suggestions.

competition between the public and private sector. Both would bid on a job. If the government could do it cheaper and better, it would get the work. "Competition between employees and outsourcing usually leads to 10 to 30 percent savings," he says.

His group has the backing of the libertarian Reason Foundation, although De-Maio himself is a Republican who has worked for President Bush and Governor Schwarzenegger on budget issues. Libertarians are especially keen on outsourcing. "DeMaio is not pushing privatization hard enough," says Richard Rider, San Diego's most outspoken libertarian. "The only way to get rid of the pension problem is to get rid of public employees."

But others argue — cogently in many cases — that privatization is no panacea. DeMaio says that the city and outside vendors could bid on maintenance of Mission Bay and Torrey Pines golf courses. Savings could be \$950,000 to \$2.8 million. However, councilmember Donna Frye, a Democrat, says, "The fact is that until October, the Mission Bay golf course was leased to a private entity. The city could not reach an agreement with the leaseholder and took the golf course over. It was a mess and hard to find out who was accountable."

Counters DeMaio, "My sources say the reason the city canceled the contract is it needed to find employment for people in groundskeeping. It canceled the contract so it didn't have to lay off city workers."

Frye also disagrees with suggestions to have more commercialization of the beaches, such as billboards on lifeguard towers. But DeMaio and Frye have great respect for one another. "She told me, 'Don't let the turkeys get you down. Don't view yourself from the downtown crowd's eyes," says DeMaio, who was warned by a city government insider, "You are not respecting social norms, not respecting the tribe."

specting the tribe." "I have looked at some of his ideas, and there are some errors. Some of the suggested changes are oversimplified, and some are valid," says Frye. "That's no different than the city manager's report." She will be working with DeMaio.

Only that kind of giveand-take will lead to the massive changes that are desperately needed. But the overlords don't want give-andtake. They only take. "We proposed weaning the convention center off its subsidy over a four-year period," says De-Maio, who believes the corporate-welfare moochers won't like that. Similarly, he wants developers to spend

more on infrastructure (such as building new fire stations). And he has a plan to boost fees of large trash haulers, although their payments would fall if they did more recycling.

Otherwise, DeMaio has not yet taken on corporate

welfare, mainly because he has concentrated on the general fund, and the corporate giveaways are concentrated in enterprise funds and special projects. The establishment's worry "is that DeMaio is not controllable," says former

councilmember Bruce Henderson. "There isn't much in his suggestions that ruffle [establishment] feathers, but their concern is that tomorrow he will ruffle feathers."

of the egregious Deferred Retirement Option Plan by which city employees almost double their pay in their last five years and walk off with both fat monthly retirement checks and generous lump sums. So labor is hopping mad. And the establishment is wary, "because in the last ten years, the corporate-welfare people got into bed with labor — to sell the ballpark, for example," says Henderson. As long as the business es-

tablishment, unions, and government leaders oppose reforms, there will be no internal pressure to clean up the city's accounting. San Diego will continue to plunder water and sewer funds and switch the money to the gen-

eral fund, raising sewer and water rates and obviating a tax-increase vote that would require two-thirds approval. The city will go on counting revenues in current years that truly belong in the following year.

What's the story behind Miranda in our Miranda rights? Were they named after a real woman? If so, was she a quiet woman? And who is the Murphy of Murphy's Law? Did anything ever go right for him?

Compared to Miranda, Murphy was a luck magnet. And Miranda wasn't very silent, which is why everything hit the fan in the first place. So here's "Eponymous Phrases for Dummies," by Matthew Alice.

Ernesto Miranda was arrested in 1963 in Arizona for robbery. While in custody, he confessed to a recent kidnapping and rape. The prosecution had no trouble persuading the jury to convict him. Defense lawyers appealed, saying Miranda had not been advised that the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution gave him the right to refuse to incriminate himself by confessing. In 1966 the U.S. Supreme Court agreed (*Miranda v. Arizona*). Miranda was retried in Arizona, using other evidence, and again found guilty; but his name has stuck to the disclaimer now read to all arrestees. P.S.: After his parole, the unfortunate defendant was killed in a bar fight. If something could go wrong for Mr. Miranda, it seems it often did.

Edward A. Murphy, on the other hand, was one of several engineers doing research for the Air Force at Edwards AFB in the mid-1940s. The experiment in question involved measuring the reaction of the human body to certain extreme forces. Only when the test was complete did they realize someone had wired some meters backwards and they had no data. One of the engineers took an already well-known adage (if something can be done two ways, one of which will be disastrous, then someone will do it that way) and assigned it the name "Murphy's Law" after his colleague. It gained popularity in military and engineering circles, then in the general population many years later. And here's Matthew's Law: If you discover there's more than one story about who Murphy was, and you think my choice sucks, then you go get your own column and you deal with these word-origin guys, who never seem to agree about anything.

Matthew, my friend:

Why do I have to turn down the volume on the car radio when I'm doing something like looking for a street address? It's like I can't find what I'm looking for with the radio on. But I can drive okay with the radio on. Does this make sense?

Waaa! Waaa! Sensory overload! Distraction, distraction! Brain log-off! Memory destruct! Way too much input, Confused, and there's plenty of neurological research to explain what's going on. Noise (including organized noise like music) interferes with task performance. Sound does share some brain pathways with visual information. You instinctively reach for the volume knob to allow your head to concentrate on one thing at a time. Tunes, especially loud, bassthumping numbers, increase stress hormones. If you're partying, being amped on adrenaline and cortisol is called "having fun." If you're late for a meeting and looking for a parking space, it's called stress. The stress also interferes with short-term memory, making it even harder to find that danged house number. You turn down the volume in sheer self-defense. Your brain thanks you.

Matt:

I've noticed a trend in a lot of the newer CDs. At the end, if you keep playing, after a few minutes a "hidden song" comes on, a song not listed on the jacket. It is on the same track as the last song listed. Why do they hide them? Wouldn't one more track make the CD more of a better deal?

A trend? This hidden-song business is so old it's more like a tradition. As for why it's done, well, for no practical reason. Just because they can do it, probably. It stopped being cool 30 years ago, but then everything old is new again, I guess. The hidden song, ghost song, or Easter egg can be a true tune, an interview, gibberish, bloodcurdling screams, whatever. You'll find them on discs by everybody from the Doors to Insane Clown Posse to Jimmy (*gag!*) Buffett — Guns N' Roses, Chris Rock, Weird Al, and Enrique (*jhtjole!*) Iglesias. The Clash's "Train in Vain" was a hidden song on the original release of *London Calling*. The Stones' 1967 LP *Their Satanic Majesties Request* has a distorted Christmas tune at the end of side one and could be the first egglike insert. Others say the Beatles' 1969 *Abbey Road* bonus, "Her Majesty," was the first true hidden songs to become unhidden (labeled — even hyped!) on remasters, re-releases, and compilation packages.

This aural "Where's Waldo?" has a newish twist. Instead of inserting the hidden song after three or four minutes of dead air after the last song, some CDs have eggs hidden before the first track. Insert the CD, press play, wait a bit, press pause, press rewind. If your counter goes back below zero, you've accessed an Easter egg. Enjoy.



Horse-Hauling Buckaroo

'm on the phone with Tony Anthony of Bob Hubbard Horse

Transportation. For readers who didn't stop by last week, Anthony has 12 years with Hubbard and has been hauling animals since 1971. Anthony tells me Hubbard's longhaul, cross-country trucks are equipped with satellite communications, "If I run into a problem, something I think is an emergency, I can reach our main office in Colton,

California, 24 hours a day, seven days a week." I ask, "Have you ever had to use it?"

Tony says, without a second's hesitation, "A codriver fell asleep on me in Oregon. We were headed south, and he drove off the road, all the way over the divider, over both northbound lanes and 110 yards into the timber. Totaled the truck out. This is 1:00 in the morning." Anthony laughs, "I was asleep in the back of the cab.

"What happened to the horses?"

"Surprisingly enough, no cripples. Some of them were a little banged up, a couple stitches here and there...a bit of a nightmare inside the trailer." So, you found the satellite gear and

called Colton?"

I hear a grunt indicating agreement. Anthony continues, "It was 1:00 in the morning, couldn't move the truck, couldn't find my cell phone. So, I used the satellite. There's a computer keyboard, there's a screen, you type in a message, and it shoots it out to an operator in San Diego who relays it back to our office in Colton."

Anthony says, more to himself than to me, "He was behind the wheel for an hour. We stopped and fueled the truck, watered the horses, got a bite to eat, did a lot of paperwork, and took off. We went through

one little town that had a 24-hour restaurant and drove past a rest area. Having done this for a long time, I know you don't fall instantly asleep. Your head bobs when you get tired. He had chances; he could have stopped. It was early in the morning, it was cool, the horses were riding good; he could have stopped for a cup of coffee. We were lucky: all the bad things that could have happened, none of them did."

"Do horses ever get ornery, get in fights while you're driving?" They must.

'You're dealing with 10 to 12 horses,' Anthony says. "They're like people. They have personalities. They have good days and bad days. They can ride side by side, day after day,

and not have a problem and all of a sudden one of them gets an attitude and explodes. Then, the one next to him gets excited and scared. The inside of a trailer is very open. Horses have stalls, but they can see each other and get to each other. They start crawling up over things. The trailer is rocking and rolling.

"You don't really want to open the doors and get in there with them, but you have to. You can't let it go on when it's your responsibility, so you grit your teeth and get in there. A person with common sense thinks, 'Hey, you got all those 1000-pound animals fighting each other. Don't get in there with them.'

"Sounds like riding bulls in a rodeo." Actually, it sounds worse.

You can bluff 99 percent of your horses. They have been convinced that humans are the boss. They don't realize that they are way bigger, way stronger than you are. If they do figure out that they are bigger and stronger, you have a serious problem. You get in there and get ahold of them, shout and scream at them, get their attention off of what they're doing to each other and on to you. It's, 'Uhoh, here's a human, I better pay attention, he's the boss.'

"Have you ever had a horse who knew he was bigger and stronger?'

"Oh, yes...thoroughbreds. They start breeding them at four or five years old. When they're 22, 23 years old, they've been doing nothing but eating and being bred and being the boss for the last 17, 18 years. No manners. They're big, they're strong; they will strike, bite, and kick."

"How do you deal with that?"

"Carefully. It's not if you get hurt; it's when and how bad you get hurt. You very seldom get hurt by a bad horse because you know he's bad and you watch him. You don't turn your back on him, you're careful around him, you're looking at him, you pay attention. It's the little private-party pet horse from somebody's back yard that you turn your back to or you get too close to. He will hurt you."

Last question. "How many bones have you broken?'

"Nothing serious. I've had ribs broken, collar bone broken, stuff like that. But, it's continual. You get kicked and it's a sore muscle or you get stepped on or you get mashed against the wall. It's not like you're disabled, but there is always something that hurts.



Early last week, Father Nabil Mouannes of St. Ephrem Mission, a Maronite parish in El Cajon, told me that he believed that the Roman Catholic Church's mystical tradition had sustained his people through many centuries of Muslim rule in Lebanon. He also said his greatest challenge in leading a parish in this part of the world was, "convincing my people that our tradi-

this part of the world was, "convincing my people that our tradition is one of holiness and intelligence and wisdom, that ours is a tradition of unity between reason and faith."

I called Father Nabil because, some weeks ago, a religious news service I subscribe to had announced that on May 16th the pope would elevate a 19thcentury Maronite monk, Nimatullah Kassab al-Hardini, to sainthood. I wondered what this meant for Maronites.

"It was an extremely joyous occasion for us," Father Nabil said. "It means a lot. Although we are part of the Roman Catholic Church, no one knows about us, especially in the Anglo-Saxon world. This canonization was a reminder that we are one with the Roman Catholic Church and that we have a very special blessing from the Lord. He's *never* left us alone, even when we were persecuted in Lebanon and nobody was asking about us. The Lord has always provided us with saints who lived as an example for us, who were willing to sacrifice everything for their faith. This is one of the great reasons why we survived."

I visited St. Ephrem last Sunday, in the middle of a three-day festival in honor of the Virgin Mary. On the parish grounds stands a very large shrine to Mary, topped by a stark white statue of her cradling the infant Jesus in her arms. Father Nabil kept urging the several hundred people present to visit the shrine and pray a special devotion to the Virgin in Aramaic, one of the languages American Maronites use in their liturgy along with Arabic and English.

St. Ephrem's liturgy was an example of what "Catholic" can mean. A female soloist led last Sunday's first hymn and it sounded to me much like a classical Arabic melody, long minor-key phrases filled with sad yearning. We stood for most of the service. And although Father Nabil and Bishop Robert Shaheen, who was on hand for the festival, celebrated the Eucharist facing the congregation, there were differences from what you might nowadays experience in your average American Roman Catholic Church.

"During this festival we honor Mary, the Mother of God, the Queen of Mothers," Bishop Shaheen said in his homily. "But what does this have to do with Pentecost? Mary was there with the Apostles to strengthen them, to love and support them. Hers is an eternal role. We know from Scripture that the Eucharist we celebrate is a feast from the beginning of time.

It was in the mind of God from the beginning of time, and in the mind of God, Mary was also present. After seeing *The Passion of the Christ*, a Protestant woman said to me, 'In our faith, we forget the Blessed Mother. The movie made me understand how she must have been broken by what happened to her son.'

"So, during this festival, we honor the Blessed Virgin, and all the people of our faith who came before us and whom she supported. They were persecuted. They could have changed their religion. But with her help, they remained faithful. May she bring to that beautiful land, Lebanon, peace and freedom."

Father Nabil had told me, "the Eucharist is a mystical experience for us. It is the center of our spiritual life. During the liturgy, we meditate upon its meaning." Last Sunday, while

Bishop Shaheen consecrated the Host, people around me for several moments covered their eyes with one hand and seemed lost in intense thought. During Communion, everyone received the Host on his tongue.

After the service, folks lined up at booths serving homemade Lebanese food. Little boys tossed around a softball in the parking lot and sold rosaries to parishioners as they left. Families swarmed around Father Nabil and Bishop Shaheen to greet and kiss them.

"We had to hide in the mountains," is what Father Nabil said when I asked him to describe the differences between Maronites and Christians in the West. "We had people who were willing to sacrifice their lives, physically, spiritually, financially, to save the community. God kept us alive as a testimony to the Muslim world. The Virgin Mary, she helped us, she protected us. They tried many times, by sword and proselytization, to convert us. We're still here."

At church on Mother's Day, I sat behind a row of ladies, all adorned with orchid corsages. Envy taunted my soul as my eyes were drawn to the stunning flowers. The flowers appeared too perfect; like masterpieces of nature in stunning color.

Orchids are the kind of flower that I consider beyond my brown thumb. Cactus and succulent gardening is what we do best around here. Friend Bernice, during our weekly coffee klatch, tried to convince me

otherwise. "I have read that orchids are actually hardy flowers," she assured me. "I think you should try one. Call an expert."

The following week, I followed her advice. I wanted to find out what are the hardy, foolproof orchids that I should start with. David Reid, owner of Reid's Orchids in northern Escondido (760-728-7996), has been growing orchids for 35 years and has 30,000 plants. "Orchids are hardy plants," Reid offered. "I have some orchids that have been growing for 30 years. They will grow on trees, the seed will get started in a tree, and that is the only watering or fertilizer that they will get. They are pretty tough plants. Some people think they are delicate, because the flowers on the cattleya orchid are delicate. Those are the ones that florists use for corsages, and they will bruise and make a brown spot, if you hit them."

Reid assured me that orchids are grown all over the world and that, even with my poor gardening skills, I could tend to an orchid. "The cymbidium orchid, anybody could grow, anywhere in San Diego County," he continued. "You don't want to grow them under direct sun, you want filtered light. You can give them morning sun, or late afternoon sun, but not the noonday sun. Their leaves are susceptible to burning — brown spots — if you have the direct sun hitting them. But bright light will make the plant bloom better. Cymbidium orchids will take temperatures down to the low 40s.

Reid informed me of some other orchid varieties for beginners. "Dendrobium kingianum are easy to grow. Brassia is another good starter plant, which can grow outside, and cattleyas are also easy to grow. You don't have to keep them as warm; they have big heavy bulbs on

once or twice, it is not going to hurt them that much because they are still going to keep on growing. You can grow most of your cattleyas outside in San Diego County, but if it gets down in the low 40s, bring them inside.

What sort of soil do you need for orchids? "Just use bark and perlite for all the orchids," said Reid. "For the cymbidium orchids, I use cymbidium bark, which is an eighth-inch to a quarter-inch bark, and then I put about 20 percent perlite and about 20 percent redwood mulch. For the cattleyas, it "Orchids are the kind of

is cattleya bark and 20 percent perlite and that is all. You can grow cattleyas in cork as well." What about water?

'Water is very important," explained Reid. "Sometimes there is a lot of salt content in the water, so the tips of the leaves will turn black from the salt in the leaves coming up. The purer the water, the better. I spray the orchids with the garden hose, in the summertime twice a week, in the wintertime once a week." For the orchids growing out of a slab of cork hanging on a wall, "I rec-ommend taking a bucket of water and putting a little fertilizer in it. Dip the plant down into it for about two seconds, and then let it hang up and dry. If you just spray it with a garden hose, the water will not get down in the sphagnum moss that is underneath the plant, holding the plant and keeping the humidity around it.'

What kind of fertilizer?

"For the average person just starting into orchids, they don't have to worry about a specialty fertilizer, they can use anything they have. If they have a lot of orchids, then buy some orchid fertilizer. I rec-

ommend using the fertilizer twice a month at half the strength. If vou fertilize once a month, the next three weeks that you water, the water is washing that fertilizer right on through. So you get a lot more benefits from your fertilizer by using half the dose twice a month."

What bugs attack orchids? "You will get snails, mealy bugs, and aphids," replied Reid. "You get snails when there is heavy watering, and you just need to use a snail killer. For mealy bugs, just touch the bug with a Q-tip dipped in alcohol and you will kill the bug. They are easy to control. The ants bring in the aphids. A lot of orchids have sap that comes out on the buds and it is sweet and the ants like that. So they will bring the aphids in there, and they milk the aphids just like cows. So keep the ants off. To deal with aphids, just spray them with malathion.³

How long will the orchids bloom? "Cattleyas' blooms will last about three weeks but the cymbidiums will last two to three months. The Noble Eyes Dendrobiums' blooms will last about two months.'

What about prices?

"I sell the miniature cattlevas for **\$10** and up. The standard cattleyas are about \$35 and up. Dendrobiums also start at \$10."

Some other orchid prices around town: G & B Orchid Laboratory in Vista sells Dendrobiums for \$11.95 and cattleyas from \$14.95 to \$19.95.

Parkview Orchids in Chula Vista sells a variety of orchids starting at \$18. Walter Andersen Nursery has orchids

for \$15 on up.

Trader Joe's is selling Dendrobiums for \$12.99

Mission Hills Nursery carries a variety of orchids for \$24.99 to \$49.99.


Twenty Years Ago

Something That Intoxicates or Exhilarates



It's all pretty unusual, when you really think about it. First off, you've got this exclusive fruit (the grape) that grows only in special regions. And then, the whole

time that it grows, it's fussed over and pruned around and prodded and worried about. Subsequently, every season, when this wonder fruit is finally picked, it gets crushed and sweetened and leavened, whereupon some expert in a cold basement slowly oxygenates its dead remains. After that, the strangely treated remains are sealed into bottles and shipped to rich folks who foster them further, these protected ghosts of grapes. And finally, of course! After years and years, the rich folks *drink* the stuff. And they claim it tastes like what? Candied cherries? Saddle leather? Smoked meat? Black licorice? Yellow flowers, flinty stones, toasted oak, and garden herbs? Is everybody serious?

Growing up, I believed that wine was simple swill: just another alcoholic beverage. Back then, I also thought that coffee was dirty water and that all beer tasted face-scrunchingly bitter. For a long time, I preferred my grape juice from Welch's. But today I sit here realizing that I've imbibed and integrated a few of the most monumental molecules that could ever touch a tongue, and those molecules have changed me: 1982 Léoville-LasCases, 1988 d'Yquem, 1990 Pétrus, 1986 Cheval Blanc, 1982 Margaux, 1975 Lynch-Bages. Those molecules are mingled now with my molecules, part of my mind and my body.

So I guess you can call me a wine lover, or if you prefer the snobbier and more affected term, then you might try to pronounce *oenophile*. For me, it's easy: I just love the stuff — reading about it, talking about it, collecting it, imagining the tastes of some of the greatest vintages, and, of course, sitting down to drink a bottle or two. To me, wine is poetry, a private enjoyment that can become, at the same time, a communal passion. And just think of the pedigree: before stamps, coins, books, butterflies, plates, cars, dolls, knickknacks, and maybe even before dust, wine was the original collectible.

Moreover, if you have even half a palate, and good appreciation skills and some disposable income, then by now you've probably discovered that wine can help you transcend your senses. The mere act of tasting takes on dimension and weight. Perhaps I'm being over the top, but I'm not embarrassed to call the drinking of fantastic wine a religious experience.

Then we might ask, o grapes, how do you do what you do? But it's some kind of natural mystery. The fact is, grapes are almost as racially diverse as human beings. And every one of them, every varietal of grape, thick-skinned or thin-, is like a supersponge, like the best nerve endings of the earth. They soak up hints and tinges of everything in the soil where they grow. Billions of years' worth of what's been in the soil. And the sun, rain, and wind determine how well they absorb this earthy information. Grapes are just immensely sensitive. And if a person's palate's sensitive as well, then these humble grapes can bring along shells, stones, woods, spices, fruits, meats, leathers, and other echoes over the bizarre paths they shuttle from branches to bellies. It's like a literal game of grapevine, many vine-


yards long.

In the game there are the masters and the makers, cellars and sellers, corks and consumers. And wine also boasts dedicated missionaries, esteemed stewards of the bacchanalian faith. These attendants are usually referred to as sommeliers. *Sommelier* is a formal title whose etymology bears close ties to the word *sumpter*, which is an archaic term for the driver of a packmule or packhorse. But the respected job of today's sommeliers is more specific: to pack *wine*, and to guide the bottles and the knowledge directly to the consumer. To do this, sommeliers become experts in beverage-department management, wine tasting, wine theory, and practical wine applications. Most of them work in restaurants, where wine is, of course, a staple.

Although I sell wine and talk wine almost every night of the week, at the restaurant where I work, I am not officially a sommelier, not even a first-level one, because I haven't taken the test. The test to become a sommelier is itself a grueling endeavor. But more about that later. Officially, there are three levels of sommeliers, with the Master Sommelier (M.S.) diploma being the highest distinction a professional can attain in fine wine and beverage service.

In the past year, I have been lucky enough to meet and drink wine with three official sommeliers, including the original master sommelier in the United States. They are normal people, of course, these stewards of wine, except for the unusual degree to which they have pursued their passion. All sommeliers have at least two distinctions in common: an enormous base of dedicated knowledge and a thoroughly talented palate.

Another thing that my three sommelier friends have in common is they all tell wonderful stories. I don't know whether this is coincidence or if it comes with the territory. It does occur to me that, to sell wine, one has to be able to persuade people.



And what an artful method of persuasion it is to spin simple narratives.

Which is to say that it's almost time, after brief introductions, to turn this wine article over to the artful words of the sommeliers themselves. But first...

Dustin Jones, 26, is the newest member of the wine fraternity. He passed the introductory-level test just a few months ago. I've waited tables for more than two years with Dustin Jones, and I think that the only accurate way to describe him is this: he's rather full of himself, but in a good way. You could err on the side of caution and grant that he's self-assured or self-possessed, but then you'd miss his essential capacity for his own personality. One time I called Jones a likable jerk, and he's really so likable that he didn't mind at all the pejorative por-

tion of the epithet. When you meet him, you're drawn in by his confidence, by the blend of boyish enthusiasm and somewhat rakish charm. In wine terms, you'd exclaim that his youthful tannins don't conflict with his stylish fruit, and yet he's got extensive proportions of both.

Megan Burgess, 30, is just a month or two away from becoming an advanced sommelier. You can tell after five minutes of talking to her that she'll have no problem with the second level of the test. She passed level one about a year ago. It takes a long time to begin to master wine. But Burgess studies like a champ, like a demon driven. If Burgess herself were a wine, we would marvel at her enormous potential. We would state that she drinks well now, but we would also speculate how the years will favor the escalating power of her flavors, her delicacy like flowers and her aggressive spice.

On the factual side of things, Megan Burgess is one of the most important buyers of wine in San Diego. She put together the wine lists for all of Sami Ladeki's specialty restaurants, and she buys the wine that keeps those lists stocked and up to date. You might mistake her for a hostess if you walk into Roppongi, but no, she runs the place. And to hear her tell it, that gender bias has a lot to do with what motivates her. At one point in our interview she said, "I thought when I turned 30 that I might start getting some of the respect that I think I deserve. I don't know. We'll see." And she cites the gender issue as well



when she discusses becoming a master sommelier. "Women are generally recognized as having more subtle and more discerning palates than men, and yet, of the 57 master sommeliers in the United States, only 11 are women." Megan Burgess wants to do her part to tip that percentage in the women's favor.

Eddie Osterland, 57, is the pioneer of the group, the first-ever master sommelier in this country. If he were wine, he'd be a monument, one of the grandest examples of a grand vintage, fully mature, but with plenty of strong years ahead of him.

Osterland spends most of his time nowadays marketing his public-speaking business. He gives keynote presentations as a during-dinner entertainer, speaking mostly to corporate groups around the country. His seminar's called "Power Entertaining with Food and Wine," and it's designed to equip the audience with new strategies for entertaining in their homes.

Osterland starts his talks by entering the meeting area or dining room to the muted strains of classical music; a glass of wine is tilted affectedly in his hand. He has his glasses pushed far down his nose, and he wears an extremely strained expression on that wizened face. His neck and chest are decorated with more than a half dozen cups and keys and ribbons of various wine societies. And he begins to speak in a pinched Germanic accent, very dry, something like, "Yes. Yes. And today, vee vill zpeak of vine. I am expeart on ze subject, of course. And zese are only zome of my avards...," a deadpan charade that he continues for an excruciating minute, making his guests squirm, before the houselights go down, and a catchy pop tune begins to blare over the speakers. By the time the lights come up again, Osterland has donned his characteristic smile, removed the cups and keys, and pushed his glasses back up to where they belong.

Then he begins to take his clients on an engaging ride through the true wonders of wine.

Whatever Osterland talks about, he makes it an engaging ride. Animated, always smiling, Osterland paces his stories to the listeners' understanding. There's the one about a bunch of sommeliers on all fours lapping some spilled precious rarity off a stone floor. Or the one where he poured \$5000 worth of first-growth Bordeaux into an overheating car radiator to make it to the airport. Whatever story Oster-

land tells, he can see if he's got you going, and if he does, then he zips in straight for the laugh, straight for the effect, the gift of the storyteller. You can be sure that if his vignette has a book in it, then he will mime the act of flipping through a book. If someone in his fiction makes a hand motion, Osterland will mimic that motion. If he's telling you what a woman said, then he's showing you too, as his voice shoots into falsetto. And it seems that everyone in an Osterland story can speak in his or her own

individual voice as well. Osterland can mimic any patois or drawl, any brogue or strange inflection, any imaginable pronunciation.

"It's kind of interesting how you get into the wine business," Eddie Osterland told me recently at his home in Pacific Beach. We sat on his wraparound black leather sofa in the house's entertainment lounge, before a 106-inch HDTV with surround Bose speakers and real slate floors, and I kept thinking, "And wine

bought all of this." By now, Osterland has become a one-man wine corporation, the charter member and sole employee of Eddie Osterland Enterprises, under which name he serves as a wine consultant for big companies. His website, eddieosterland.com, is a reflection of his massive knowledge and palpable charm. "I was waiting tables in Honolulu, about 20, 25 years ago or so," Osterland begins. (As an aside, I want to tell you how Osterland spent most of his bachelorhood in

Hawaii: he was an amateur jet pilot with a pet monkey. 'Nuff said.) "So one night at the restaurant, the maître d' comes up to me, and he's carrying that hardware that a sommelier wears the cup and the chain and the key — and he's got it in his hand, and he walks up to me and he puts it around my neck, and he goes, 'Eddie, I want you to do me a favor tonight. Pierre, the sommelier, he's sick tonight, so I want you to do it.' And I almost just had this, like, instant diarrhea. "I just went, 'No!

Don't do that to me. You know I drink wine, but I never even looked at the wine list, I don't know anything, I can't do this.' And he says, 'Look, I got a lot of things on my mind tonight, and one of them is not going to be you and this thing. You want to work here, do this. Here's the rules: red wine goes with meat, white wine goes with fish. And if they're on the fence, shoot 'em a rosé, you're safe. Okay? Go.' So put me in, coach! And the guy just walks away. "So I picked up the

looked at this leather book. Open it up, saw the first line says wine number 131. Château Bellegrave. Nice and fruity with a crisp, clean finish. Delicious. Shut the book. Great.

"Soon as I did that, some people were coming into the restaurant. You know, it's, like, starting to fill up, and all of a sudden, somebody raises his hand, and he wants to see the wine steward. So I walk over there nervous as can be, and the guy says, 'Well, you know, my wife's having the scampi, and I'm thinking of having the rack of lamb. What would you recommend?' And I said, 'Um, number 131 here is nice and fruity with a crisp, clean finish. Delicious.' And the guy says, 'Okay, if you say so, then we'll do that.' So my confidence just went up a whole notch.

"You know, so I run across the room, the next guy raises his hand, and this guy's from Oklahoma. He goes, 'Hello there, pardner. My wife and I are gonna have that heman cattle-and-cut porterhouse twopound steak. What would you recommend?' So I said, 'For that, I'd like to recommend this number 131, fruity, with a crisp, clean finish. Delicious.' The guy says, 'Well, okay, if you say so, then we'll go with that.' You know, and all of a sudden, my confidence jumped up again.

"And I walked around all night, selling number 131 to just about everybody and taking orders from people who know what they want, which is rare. And you know, at the end of the night, my pocket's full of tip money; I'd had a lot of fun. And I realized, I don't know anything about wine, but everybody was believing me. And I just thought, this is fun, but I wonder what it would be like if I *did* know about wine. How much more fun would that be?

"So I thought about this, and one night, in one of the restaurants I was working in, a man came in who owned a little château in France, and we started talking about wine, and he said, you know, if I were you, I'd forget about doing a master'slevel degree in psychology. I'd study wine.

And if you want to do it, then I can help you. Because, he says, I live in Bordeaux and San Francisco, and there's a school in Bordeaux that offers a degree in professional wine tasting, not wine making. It's called evaluation. It's a two-and-a-halfyear program. And he said, do you speak French? And I said no. So he told me I'd have to go to an advanced language school for a year and learn French, but if I wanted, then he could set all of that up. So I thought about it for a weekend. I said, put me in! Let's go!

"So I packed up all of my affairs and moved to France. And spent about nine months at the University of Poitiers learning French. And then I traveled around a little bit to Germany. And then I went to Bordeaux, to this incredible course taught by Dr. Emile Peynaud, who is arguably the world's finest professor on the taste of wine, and this guy was the teacher. And it was just incredible to hear. I was the only kid in this class, you know, average age about 40, and they were all serious



players — this guy over here owned Château Giscours, Pierre Tari, and Christian Moueix from Pétrus. I mean, some major hitters, and I was only 24 years old. So I was there for a couple of years with these guys, and it was just a fascinating experience, you know, it went so deep and went in so many different directions.

"So then I got out of school with a degree which licensed me with the French government to be a taster, and I worked for the French government as a taster

in St. Julien, which was an interesting experience. And then I went on and worked at the Hotel de la Poste in Beaune as their head sommelier. And then I went to London, and I just wanted to see about this master sommelier exam. So I went there, and I passed the exam, and then I realized, okay, this was my calling. So the formal education was done.

"And I came back to the United States, and I did lots of things, working as a wholesaler selling wine to restaurants, and I worked as a sommelier, of course. In fact, the best gig I ever had was when I was working as a wholesaler during the day and as a sommelier at night, so I was selling myself the wine that I was going to sell to a customer. I just kept moving it through the restaurant and getting a commission on both ends. It was a sweet deal. Anyway, fast-forwarding, I've been in San Diego for the last 10 or 11 years, and for the last 3 years especially, I now have a public-speaking business. And that's really

about all I do."

As I alluded to earlier, Osterland's lessons on wine are fascinating and informative. "One of the key things I noticed as a wine judge: you're often sitting down in front of ten wines, blind, and you're trying to ascertain which one's better. But when they're all \$80 or \$90 bottles of wine, it's hard, because they're all great. But one of the only ways to split hairs and see which wines are better is to be really hungry. Your appetite has to be peaking, at its zenith.

And that being the case, most of our wine tastings run at 11:30 in the morning, because that's when your palate is at its sharpest. But it doesn't stay sharp for very long. In fact, our tastings never went longer than 45 minutes. But at the end of 45 minutes, it's a mental exercise discerning shades of excellence, and you're tired, you're fatigued. So I always say, let's get the business of tasting and fineness, let's make the discoveries, let's show off some really great things first, and then

let the conversation go into whatever direction it wants to go.

"The other thing I say to people is, get out of your comfort zone. Too often, people these days, from what I see, they play it safe. You know, playing it safe is like the typical Saturday-night dinner where you start the fish course with chardonnay, and then you do merlot or cabernet with the meat course, which is nice and it's fun, but that's what everyone's doing. So if you want to be different, you have to get out



of that comfort zone.

"I think the real beauty of wine is, first of all, when you pull that cork, you don't know what the wine's going to taste like. Always. It's always like a discovery waiting to unfold itself. And every year a whole set of vintages changes, so your favorite wine last year may not be your favorite this year. And that's fun. So going out to wine stores and trying different wines is something I love to recommend. I also think that wine is a synergistic thing, in a word. Wine is good;

cheap wines and the good stuff. "The difference between a wine that's \$10 and a wine that's \$35 isn't that one of them is 3¹/₂ times better," he explains. "You know, unfortunately it doesn't work that way. It's kind of analogous to photography. It's like a third of a stop difference in exposure. When you have them side by side...you know, the \$10 bottle of wine's fine until you have the \$35 bottle of wine there, and when you taste that, all of a sudden you see it's got multiple dimensions, it

food is good; but the two of them together add up to three."

Against wine snobbery, Osterland has this delightful joke: "Wine is 85 percent water and 13 percent alcohol. So that leaves only 2 percent for the stuff that really matters. Don't overdo it. Wine wasn't meant to be overblown."

On the other side of the coin, though, Osterland does draw a distinction between

And you know, most people aren't like that; they're just rushing through meals, not appreciating, not taking the time to slow down. It's hard to teach appreciation. I sometimes think it's one of those things, you either have it or you don't."

Appreciation is a gift that Megan Burgess enjoys in spades. When she talks about wine, she uses reverential words like "sexy" and "amazing." You can tell that she loves drinking and teaching about good wine more than she likes making money off it.

Burgess and I met recently in Roppongi to discuss her growing passion for wine and her growing importance within the wine business. As it is with most of us, Burgess can tie her fervor for wine back to a single significant bottle, the original sample that turned her head, the initial sip that put her on the path of the connoisseur. For me, it was the 1982 Château d'Yquem. For Osterland, it was an old Wehlener Sonnenuhr by J.J. Prüm. Soon we will learn that Dustin Jones's watershed bottle was the '82 Lafite-Rothschild. Burgess calls the drinking of this bottle the "lightbulb moment."

"I grew up in Canada," Burgess began, "so my first experiences with wine weren't with American product, but more with French. My parents are by no means wine connoisseurs. So probably my first experiences with wine would have been around the holidays: Beaujolais, chardonnay, Chablis. But it wasn't really until I moved to the States that I became really interested in wine. Even in culinary school I wasn't that interested yet, because I didn't have enough one of the clients had purchased it and left, like, a half of a bottle, and we were trying it in the servers' station, and that was, like, my lightbulb moment of saying, 'Oh, my God.

They inflect their voices, tell stories, and each one has this terrific ability to tap into his interior monologue, to talk to himself while he's talking to you, to tell himself a story at the same time he's telling you one.

exposure, I didn't know enough about it.


"But then I tried the '94 Rochioli pinot noir. I was working at Harry Denton's in San Francisco, right down on the water there, and This is such an amazing experience.' "And I think that my experience as a cook, and going through culinary school, helped me develop my palate without even knowing it, just being able to identify different tastes and different flavors. And that wine was so supple and so sexy that I was just stunned. And that's when I knew that I really wanted to focus on that."

By "focus on," Burgess really means something closer to "devote my life to." Her biography describes a life of interesting work and experiences in exotic places, everything centering on wine, wine, wine.

"When I lived in San Francisco, I took a lot of trips up to Napa. I participated in press at Sterling Winery, and that to me was just amazing. When you do the press, you're working with all these immigrant laborers. I mean, they're farmers, and the labor's hard. It's back-breaking labor. You're out there and you're stooped over, and it took a little bit of the romance out of it. But then I could really see. I really experienced what a harmony wine is. It's like this harmony between the earth and the everyday worker, and the end result of this beautiful, sexy product. It was just amazing to me. Picking grapes into these huge buckets, and these trucks were coming along picking them up. The camaraderie of the workers...it's very precise. It's really nothing like that old *I Love Lucy* episode. Not anymore.

"To me, what's so amazing about wine is the fact of that harmony: man takes something from nature and turns it into something incredible. And the fact that it can be so different. That one varietal can be so different depending on where it's planted, and how much sun it gets,

To me, that's the high, the adrenaline rush, bringing wine to people who enjoy wine, but they've just never had anyone take their hand and guide them toward something new.

"My advice for people is to trust an expert. Open yourself up. Try new experiences. You shouldn't always just stick with what you know. My advice for people is, if you've got a local wine shop that you trust, then I think you should get to know the guys who work there and let them recommend a few things. And then if you like those wines, let them recommend a few more. That's just an invaluable asset. If you can find a great little retail shop that's in your local area and you can befriend the guy who works there, who tastes all the time, and vou can sort of tell him a little bit about what you like, then he can really steer you towards what you're looking for."

If her pure motivation and learned counsel aren't impressive enough, then you might find the discipline Burgess displays in her wine studies to be, quite frankly, inspiring. "I passed my first-level sommelier test last year, and now I'm studying for the second level. They have a recommended reading list, and so I'm reading a lot. "There are three

for the test: theory, service, and blind tasting. Service I participate in every day, so that's no problem. I feel comfortable in wine service, and I partake in it every day. And the theory part of it is covered in all the recommended books that I'm studying. But the wine tasting, I think, is the part of it that probably has the highest failure rate. So I've started a wine-tasting group, and we taste twice a month, every two weeks. One session is

white and one session is red, and we bring our own wines and we taste them blind. The class is all just people who are heading toward the same goal. They've all taken the first level, or they're heading toward taking their first level, and we follow the format to a T, and it's fun. It's an interesting group of people."

I asked Burgess to talk about the pinnacle of the sommelier's craft, the daunting prospect of blind tast-

ing. To be able to precisely identify the flavors in a wine and then, without any other clues, to extrapolate your experience with those flavors into identifying the wine: what kind, where it's from, who made it, and often even the year when it was made. Now that is a mindblowing level of mastery.

"Tasting wine is one thing," Burgess says. "It's great, but blind tasting is another thing altogether. One, you're always kind of surprised by what you do know. Especially if you're with a group of tasters and you're all comparing notes. For example, I have trouble tasting herbs in wine, but there's another person in our group who's great with herbs. I mean, dead-on. And that helps me because then I start to remember those herbs the next time I taste them. There's another girl in our group who's great with flowers, and she picks those out all the time.

"Personally, my thing is, because of where I grew up, I'm very good with earth smells and grass smells and stones and vegetable smells, because that's where my background lies and what I've been exposed to. There's another person, you know, who's kind of funny, he's always, like, 'Okay, that smells like Jolly Ranchers,' and he's a city kid, so it's funny, because among this group of people, we make the perfect palate. So we learn from each other, and it helps so much. Because, at the tasting level of the sommelier exam, you have 20 minutes and four wines. And you have to nail it. I mean, there are points given for how you come to the deduction you come to

whether you nail the wines or not, but that's the area that most people have difficulty in." (Dustin Jones will tell us more about the experience of the sommelier test soon, soon enough.)

In the meantime, watching Burgess work, I get the impression that she's doing exactly what she was meant to do. She's a natural, and her love of the restaurant business, especially the wine part of the restaurant business, saturates her attitude in all that she does. You pair that kind of love with equal doses of ambition and dedication, and you get a very special specialist indeed.

"I want to be a master sommelier someday, because, to me, anything worth doing is worth doing well. And I want to go all the way with this. I love a challenge. And

this is a business that I will never leave. I did leave it once to work at a law firm for a very short period of time, but I couldn't stand it. Sitting at a desk all day was just not me. I started in this business when I was 15, washing dishes in a restaurant. I've worked literally every job in a restaurant. And now I have so much respect for everyone on my team, because I know how important they all are."

Dustin Jones is on my team at Tapenade Restaurant, and he's the first official sommelier we've ever had working there. He and I will often talk wine at the same table, comparing our knowledge and blowing away the guests, and learning from each other. Jones's wine expertise is only a couple of years in the making, but he is now that lucky person who discovers a way to earn money by doing the thing that he enjoys. "My interest in

wine, at first, was really







about making money. I was, like, if I learn about this, I can make more money in tips. So I guess it was financially driven at first. And I didn't even really like wine at first. I remember at one point I was, like, 'I don't like white wine.' And now, vou know, I laugh at that statement, because I started drinking good white wines. I think that we have this belief that white wine has to

be cheap and dry and doesn't really do much except that it pairs with fish, and that's about it. But as I started to drink some better white wines, actually, now I think I prefer white wines.

"But I actually stumbled into my interest in wine while I was working at Café Pierre up in Los Angeles. They have an unbelievable wine list, about a thousand bottles, and

this guy comes in, turns out to be a high honcho producer or something. John Langley. Produces Cops. I didn't know any of this, and I was closing, and he comes in at about 10:30, which is pretty late, and I was kind of like, boo, you know, and he orders an '82 Lafite-Rothschild, a thousand dollars, most expensive bottle on the list. Punch it in the computer, you know, still don't even know what he ordered, and I look: a thousand-dollar bottle. Oh my God. You know, the money's kind of jumping around in my head.

"And so I open the wine. He wants it decanted. What is that? So we go through all this decanting, all new to me, and I learned a little bit there about drinking old stuff and getting air at it. So I poured it off for him and the lady he was with, and he tells me to grab a glass. So I grab a glass. And he pours me a full glass and goes, 'Drink this, and you'll see why we pay a thousand dollars for a bottle of wine.' And I drank it, and instantly, I did. I understood it, because it was unbelievable. The flavors and the concentration, and there was just a lot going on. And that made me really kind of think, okay, this is an interesting business.

"When I was a kid, my dad was a chef. So, you know, I ate a lot of food in his restaurants, and he drank a lot of wine. And when I was younger, he'd kind of show me a lot of the pairings, things like, oh, chardonnays with fish and Burgundies with pasta and pizza, and so I kind of, I guess I've always been a food person. So the progression of, when I was old enough to drink, then I could really start matching

the food with the wine, and that little marriage, and that's what kind of got me going.

"And by now I've read a lot of books, a lot of wine books, you know, Windows on the World was my first wine book. And it was interesting to kind of see the different regions and how different regions kind of grow the same grapes, and why grapes from one region taste different from the other. And as I began to sell these wines, I began

tasting a lot of these wines, and with that, really, that's when wine kind of grew into a big interest."

But the real watershed moment in the wine life of Dustin Jones occurred when he met Eddie Osterland. Osterland often eats at Tapenade, and Jones remembers fondly that first time the two of them met. "So this guy sits

down with a lady at table 14, and he orders a bottle of Château Pipeau. Not a great bottle, you know, 50, 60 bucks, and I bring it to the table, show him it, and he feels the botmaster sommelier, you know. I'm, like, put it on ice?! Man, this is a red wine. Where are


tle. He goes, 'Um, could you put this on ice for a minute?' And I had no idea this guy was a

"And that got me interested, and we got to talking, but he didn't say who he was until after the dinner. And at



the wines of the world. You know, Romania and Hungary in 6 minutes. Chile in 15 minutes. Italy in 45 minutes. It was amazing. And the test itself, at the end of two days, was really tough. The first four questions, I started to shake. I didn't think I was going to pass. I didn't know anything. I couldn't even guess the first four questions. But then I got, like, 20 or 25 in a row. And a couple of wines that I know from Tapenade really saved me, because we serve them here at work.



mily Dickinson wrote, "I heard a fly buzz - when I died" during the Civil War in 1863, according to her latest editor. Some critics have been critical of her detachment from the general suffering and death during the war, but for Dickinson suffering (and especially death) is never general: it's always the suffering and death of a particular, irreplaceable person. Its cause is incidental to its singular effect, both on that person and on the people who love her or him. In December 1862, she wrote in a letter:

Sorrow seems more general than it did, and not the estate of a few persons, since the war began; and if the anguish of others helped one with one's own, now would be many medicines.

'Tis dangerous to value, for only the precious can alarm. I noticed that Robert Browning has made another poem, and was astonished - till I remembered that I, myself, Her detachment seems even stranger as the figure debunks the conventional notion of a peaceful afterlife.

in my smaller way, sang off charnel steps. Every day life feels mightier, and what we have the power to be, more stupendous.

She had just turned 32. The habit of mind radiating from these four sentences has been disciplined to mistrust conventional social constructions of experience — a habit of mind whose reward is not the fatuous pleasure of cynicism, but the emotional sustenance that may issue from clarity. This is her faith. Writing, especially writing formed into poetry, was its instrument. It was tested, as faith is, almost constantly ("I wish 'twas plainer, Loo, the anguish in this world. I wish one could be sure the suffering had a loving side"). Her bedroom from the ages of 16 to 24 overlooked the village graveyard; repeatedly, in the close community of Amherst, she was privy to the loss of children, parents, spouses, intimates. Her beloved young cousins, Louise and Francis Norcross, to whom this letter was addressed, would soon be orphaned — their mother had died two years before and their father would die within a month. Dickinson's own mother was an invalid, and Dickinson herself may have already been suffering the initial symptoms of the anterior uveitis that made her think she was going blind. And her conclusion is: "Every day life feels mightier, and what we have the power to be, more stupendous."

This startling conclusion from such misfortune and anguish turns on the sentence that precedes it: "I remembered that I, myself, in my smaller way, sang off charnel steps." Her mighty life and stupendous power issued from a poetic practice predicated on humility: a "smaller way" that produces limitless capacity. Such humility, and the daily spiritual discipline it requires, opens the world to view and inexhaustibly expands its circumference. There is no "egotistical sublime" in her



poetry, no Romantic aggrandizement of The Poet as the term applies to her — and no personal privileges that come with the job, except for the exceptional gift it offers to "dwell in Possibility," to use its special form to see, to sing, to love, to pray: "to gather Paradise" on this earth.

Therefore it is no accident that the form she

chose for her poems was both a liturgical and musical one: liturgical, because her poetic practice is religious (Oxford English Dictionary: "a particular system of faith or worship"); musical, because music orchestrates feeling (which is why it's so useful to institutionalized religion). Dickinson grew up hearing hymns and playing them on the piano. The form of the hymn stanza was engraved into her brain. The hymn stanza grew out of the ballad stanza: four beats, three beats, four beats, three beats in alternating isochronous lines of varying numbers of syllables locked in a rhyming quatrain. Words thus arranged become both mysteriously compelling and easy to remember, and have a tenacious popular

appeal that makes the stanza's transference from ballad to hymn seem historically inevitable as soon as the power of churches depended as much on the laity as on the hierarchy. The hymns Dickin-

son grew up hearing often borrow the skeleton of ballad narrative along with the ballad stanza. These songs of praise (hymnos) had been thoroughly married to the testimonial story by Isaac Watts and a hundred years of protestant hymns by the time they were being robustly sung every Sunday in Amherst's First Church. Watts was 43 years younger than Dryden and 14 years older than Pope, a contemporary of Congreve and Addison. To us (and to Dickinson) his testimonial stories may

seem metronomic, pat, purposeful, and subservient to their all-tooobvious intentions, but the urgency that is their occasion — that they *must* be told — was engraved into Dickinson's brain as deeply as their stanza form. The stories her poems tell, when they tell stories, are arresting and important, and often dramatize a single moment

"Life is death we're lengthy at, death the hinge to life," she wrote to the Norcross sisters in late May 1863, after their father was dead. Was she thinking of this poem — which she may have just written or was about to write? She was certainly thinking of its subject. In 92 words, 16 lines, and 4 sentences, she gets as close to that hinge as can be — from both sides of the door. The first line-and-sentence ("I heard a Fly buzz - when I died -") hooks us completely, but the suspense doesn't derive from our wanting to know what will happen (it tells us what happened) but from our wanting to know how somebody could tell us what happened when she

died. At the moment we finish reading the sentence, the moment-inthe-past being told is distinguished from the moment-in-the-present of telling. The grammatical completion of the sentence coincides with a logical anomaly: We're being spoken to by a dead person. Is this a joke? The meaning of the sentence is clear, but we don't know how to understand it. Plus its rhythm is unsettling: the stress on "buzz" comes a syllable too soon. We don't know whether to stress "when" or not. In

the warp speed world of the brain in which we process grammar-andrhythm, we stick on "Fly buzz ---." We feel something odd going on. One line-and-sentence into the poem, we're immersed in an is-and-isn't world. Chekhov said never put a loaded shotgun on the stage without someone shooting it before the end of the play. How could someone tell us what happened when she died? is the loaded shotgun - on a stage set at a disorienting angle. This shotgun does get shot, but not



Is this how someone could tell us she heard a fly buzz when she died? Only if ever the word "like" is used, it implies a mind making the comparison, reminding us that there is someone telling this story — someone, dead or alive, who has paid very close attention to Storm, of both the literal and metaphorical variety. The speaker characterizes herself through the character of her observation. A


we thought the reason she could speak posthumously was that the room had been so quiet. The stillness in this room is a particular stillness, and, in being so precisely described, may divert us briefly. We're put into the room where the speaker died. We're in the story. But whenlarge part of our response to the poem is to the creation of a speaker we respond to. (Dickinson reminded Higginson, "When I state myself, as the Representative of the Verse - it does not mean - me - but a supposed person.") This "supposed person" is someone we want

to listen to, someone detached enough from the moment of her own death to compare the stillness in the room to what she has previously observed in nature ("the stillness in the air between the heaves of storm"). She's already dead is why she's so detached, we might induce, except the figure she uses implies Storm is continuous. If this stillness in this room is indeed like the stillness in the air between the

heaves of storm, then what follows is also Storm, both in this room (for the deathwatchers) and in the next "life" (for the speaker) on the other side of the hinge. Her detachment seems even stranger as the figure debunks the conventional notion of a peaceful afterlife. Wherever this speaker is speaking from, she's neither smug nor solaced, much less saved. If she were, the poem would be wrecked. It would be pietistic, a church hymn instead of a peculiar testimony. We wouldn't like the speaker because she wouldn't be like us, still swirled by Storm.

Then the narrative shifts back in time, in the room, in the life we know and a Heave of Storm we're familiar with:

> The Eyes around - had wrung them dry -And Breaths were gathering firm

For that last Onset - when

the King Be witnessed - in the Room-

The past perfect tense ("had wrung") effects the time shift. It instantly sets back the clock (a few seconds, a few minutes?) in order to move the story forward again to the inexorable moment. The speaker recedes into the background of the deathbed scene and into the minds of the deathwatchers preparing to see God at the Moment of Truth à la Calvinist doctrine. That they are "Eyes" and "Breaths," and that her death is called "that last Onset," doesn't let us forget the speaker's distinctive point-of-view and character.

With a wry joke, she gestures toward the loaded shotgun jutting out of the closet:



"What portion of me be assignable": Buried in this little efficient joke is the assertion that there's a portion of her that's not assignable, which is the portion (since she's dead) that is telling the story which, for lack of a better term, is usually called the soul. That we're being told a story by a dead person is a joke, just as we suspected after reading the first line-and-sen-



It's a different kind of joke: the sort caused by the uncanny, provoking astonishment not cruelty, fueled as the best jokes are by terror at the inevitable and uncontrollable. It may make us happy to feel safe for now, if not safe for very long from now. It rings a chord with the irony of hearing a fly buzz at the moment of death and reminds us yet again that we're not just in the story but in the presence of someone alive-in-death (this "soul") that we're getting to know pretty well by line 11.

The joke, its effects, and its buried assertions merge very quickly (within

there interposed a Fly with) and the first triple adjectives (Blue - uncertain - stumbling) in a poem that has almost no adjectives elsewhere much less triple ones. The sentence's grammar in lines 11–13 interposes between the reader and the forward motion of the narrative (since action is carried through subject-verbobject) just as the fly in the story interposed between the speaker and the light. This gives us the experience of "interposed." The spatial and temporal experience referred to *by* the words is rendered through the sequence of the words fixed into form. We're locked into the perspective of the person dying, the character in the story. At the same time, the circumlocution calls our attention to the person "living," the teller of the story. "And then there interposed a Fly" would have focused only on what happened, whereas "and then it was [that] there interposed a Fly" hauls the shotgun onto center stage before the grammar becomes direct and action compressed through the

climactic final two words of the poem.

"And then the Windows failed — and then/ I could not see to see ----"Ka-boom goes the shotgun. The final miraculous move is to turn irony itself on its ear. This ugly annoying fly is the last thing the speaker sensed on earth, and, ironically, it's what appears while the deathwatchers were expecting the King God to appear. But then "I could not see to *see* -": even this lowly creature provides a great occasion. The assertion buried here is that this great occasion is available to us only while we have physical eyes — only while we're alive for the sacramental act of seeing, only when we're not distracted by doctrine that calls for the appearance of a grandiose God instead of moment-by-moment attention to the humble things of the earth.

But Dickinson isn't preaching, she's practicing. Impossibly, she breaks down the indivisible moment of death into a sequence of smaller moments (And then...and then...and then): after there interposed a fly, the windows fail. The world acts almost independently of the character-in-thestory while we are inside her point-of-view. Death is something that happens to her, that happens to people. We feel how it feels. We are helpless, on a battlefield or in a bedroom. And this particular death then produces a particular incapacity in this particular person who, up until that last nanosecond, could see to see. It's

"to see." For Isaac Watts, absolute metricality was indicative of higher organization, lifting discourse out of the flawed contingency of human usage. For Dickinson, poems are utterly contingent, yet

characteristic of Dickinson's technique that this runic final line is utterly grounded by its formal solidity, the "not see" echoing the double stress of "Fly buzz" (and "last On[set]" and "me be") before the iambic final

profoundly organized. Musical does not mean sonorous, any more than rhythm means meter: it means affecting our feelings by means of manifold pattern. According to Dickinson's friend, Kate Anthon, "on those





Dickinson also played such melodies in her poems. These 16 lines rhyme Room-Storm-firm-Room, and be-Fly-mesee: eight-line asymmetrical pairs that contain respectively three sentences and one sentence of five independent clauses. The half-rhymes mark the endings of alternating tetrameter-trimeter lines but don't chop the lines into discrete units. The hymn is underneath the speech not abstracting it. The power of the testimony depends on its credibility as speech, hence the enjambed sentences

How could this person have lived without seeing, without reading and writing?

and emphatic metrical irregularities and contrapuntal dashes. The rhythm not only expresses the experience, it is the experience. In the first eight-line pair, the rhyme words (Room-Stormfirm-Room) form an envelope of the room. In the second eight-line pair (be-Fly-me-see), the Fly is distinct and unleashed. With "see to see" we actually get five rhyme-words. We're brought up short on the first "see." The pattern is fulfilled early, then drummed again on the second, most emphatic, see. We have to know what this see means to say it properly, but the rhythm forces us to say it properly thereby teaching us what it means.

we're still alive. The poignancy is fused with moral force. The final line lifts us out of the poem with something we could use to enrich our lives while riveting us down with what it

means to die: to lose the capacity to see physically and spiritually.

This line may be even more poignant if we think of Dickinson in 1863 worrying about going blind (and rapidly making fair drafts of all her poems and gathering them into fascicles). Vision is ubiquitous in her work, as it was in her life, with vistas from both her bedroom where she wrote and the cupola on top of the house. How could *this* person have lived with-

out seeing, without reading and writing? But her worry may have caused this great line to come to her. Her suffering may have contained this gift. She is a master of paradox, of the blessing in disguise and delusion in triumph, of articulating what Richard Wilbur called "sumptuous destitution." And of course the larger assertion buried in the rhetoric of this poem is that one can tell the story of one's death after one dies - at least this "sup-

posed person" can for the time of this particular poem. Afterlife is not proved but enacted, although the "Heaven above" may pale compared to the "Heaven below." This is the wryest joke of the poem, and, if fully understood, the saddest and the sweetest and (paradoxically) the most hopeful.

"It is not that it was so," Aristotle says in The Poetics about the credibility of a story, "but that it might be so": just one of the artistic thrills Dickinson must have felt writing "I heard a Fly buzz when I died -" was in testing how far Aristotle's principle can be extended, and extended in a poem (this poem). Solace is too pale a word for what the poet gets from the contingent renderings-inlanguage her poems yield to her (and to us). It is something more active than solace: vital, childlike, permeated by pleasure and prowess, a beatific joy made up of horrific pain that does not make the pain less horrific but gives it a name that is one particular poem then another then another that does not only what no other form of discourse does but also what no other poem does, has, or ever will.



CAN ONLY GOD MAKE A LAWN?

Grasses indigenous to North America did not produce good lawn; they were rough after cutting and green only during the growing season.

OWED LAWN GRASSES seem oddly perverse. Their ideal state is timeless, unchanging, eternal; they grow and grow and grow and never mature. The *telos*, the genetically programmed desire, of plant life *is* to mature and reproduce itself. Nowhere in nature do grass blades grow upward to a two-inch height, and then chop themselves off, making themselves perpetually preadolescent botanical *castrati*. Nowhere in nature do grasses — if not interrupted by acts of God — *not* flower, go to seed and propagate.

The current definition of a good lawn, according to cultural historian Virginia Scott Jenkins's *The Lawn: A History of an American Obsession*, is "a plot with a single type of grass with no intruding weeds, kept mown at a height of an inch and a half, uniformly green, and neatly edged." To maintain such a lawn demands that on a weekly basis the life cycle of lawn grasses be interrupted. Slicing off the blade's chlorophyll-rich photosynthesizing tip diminishes the grass's ability to make and store food, which in turn means fertilizer must be applied. A lawn is rather like a braindead ten-year-old, kept alive on an IV-drip.

In the United States, as of 1991, some 45 million home lawns, more than 50,000 square miles, about the size of the state of Illinois, were trying to go to seed and being frustrated in that attempt. Home lawns — plus parks, golf courses, and lawns surrounding public buildings and cemetery markers and separating freeways — from coast to coast have replaced forests, deserts, wetlands, and meadows with savannahs composed of turf grasses not native to America.

The grass lawn is so common a part of the American

landscape that a youngster easily might believe that God seeded one after another of these sharply edged green turfs during His seven-day creation frenzy. But He didn't. According to historian Jenkins, the lawn as we know it is recent and peculiarly American.

The definition of lawn, writes Jenkins, has changed several times during the last 400 years. In the 16th Century, when Francis Bacon observed that "nothing is more pleasant to the eye than green grass finely shorn" and the lawn mower was a sheep, the word lawn, from launde or land, referred to an open space or glade in the woods. In the 17th Century a lawn was a stretch of untilled ground covered with grass; when this grass was cut, men armed with scythes did the cutting. By the 18th Century lawn had



come to mean a portion of a garden or pleasure ground covered with grass and kept closely mowed.

Before the Civil War, few Americans other than the wealthy kept front lawns. Most grass growing near a house was rough pasture. Grasses indigenous to North America did not produce good lawn; they were rough after cutting and green only during the growing season. Houses in American towns tended to be built close to the street and fronted by a small fenced garden. Farm houses and out-buildings were surrounded by pasture, fields, or gardens and a packed dirt farmyard where chickens pecked at insects and the farm wife tossed the "slops," or kitchen garbage. In the South, swept dirt or sand, covered with pine straw, surrounded houses. In the Southwest, adobe houses were built

In the 1830s an English textile engineer recognized that the machine used to shear soft nap away from carpets could be rebuilt as a machine that cut grass. The engineer fabricated a reel mower. The mower was not produced in quantity, because little demand either in England or the United States existed for it. What grass-cutting got done was still done primarily by sheep or scythesmen.

Jenkins traces the development of the post-Civil War single-family house surrounded by grass through three major suburban movements. Suburban communities, founded between 1850-1880 near Boston, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Chicago, and New York, were made possible by expansion of railroad, street car, and trolley lines. These late-19thcentury suburban communities, built for upperand upper-middle-class families, were modeled after parks and frequently given the name "Park," as in Tuxedo Park in New York or Takoma Park near Washington, D.C. Some excellent descriptions of these suburbias can be found in Dreiser's Sister Carrie and E.L. Doctorow's newest novel, The Waterworks. In the latter, Doctorow writes:

> The War of Secession made us rich. When it was over there was nothing to stop progress - no classical ruins of ideas no superstitions to retard civil republican ardor. Not so much had to be destroyed or overturned as in the European cultures of Roman towns and medieval guilds. A few Dutch farms were razed, villages melded into towns, towns burned into precincts, and all at once block and tackle were raising the marble and granite mansions of Fifth Avenue. ... Almost a million people called New York home, every-



one securing his needs in a state of cheerful degeneracy. Nowhere else in the world was there such an acceleration of energies. A mansion would appear in a field. The next day it stood on

a city street with horse and carriage riding by.

As Jenkins indicates, no single person so strongly influenced the aesthetic of early suburbias as Frederick Law Olmsted (1822-1903). Best

known as designer in 1858 of New York City's Central Park, Olmsted's ambition was to adapt the 18th-century informal English garden to an American setting, particularly in parks for public use. Olmsted had

toured England in 1850, visiting Liverpool's Birkenhead Park, the first landscaped park intentionally laid out for public use. Olmsted recorded his journey abroad in his 1852 Walks and Talks of an American *Farmer in England*, noting about Birkenhead Park that "in democratic America, there was nothing to be thought of as comparable to with this People's Garden." (In California, Olmsted was principal landscape designer, in 1888, for Stanford University's campus.)


In 1868, Olmsted was commissioned to design Riverside, outside Chicago, one of America's first planned suburbias. Olmsted recommended that each house be set back a minimum of 30 feet from the sidewalk. In spite of the Tory Anglophilia exhibited by many among America's new monied classes and their longing to recreate in the new America the old



essential element of beauty on the grounds of a suburban house." And: "An unbroken lawn around the dwelling should typify the unwritten page in the opening book of earnest life." Scott recommended that other elements — flowers, trees, lawn furniture — be only secondary to the lawn. About flowers, he wrote: "Imagine bits of lace or bows of ribbon stuck promiscuously over the body and skirt of a lady's dress. 'How vulgar!' you exclaim. Put them in their appropriate places and what charming points they make! Let your lawn be your home's velvet robe, and your flowers its not too promiscuous decoration."

Like Olmsted before him, Scott abhorred the barriers that surrounded English and Continental houses. Scott wrote, "There is no way in which men deprive themselves of what costs them nothing and profits them much, more than by dividing their improved grounds from their neighbors, and from the view of passers on the road, by fences and hedges. The beauty obtained by throwing front grounds open together is of that excellent quality which enriches all who take part in the exchange and makes no man poorer."

Scott goes further, however, than Olmsted, from a political to a religious argument. "It is unchristian," Scott wrote, "to hedge from the sight of others the beauties of nature which it has been our good fortune to create or secure; and all the walls, high fences, hedge screens, and belts of trees and shrubbery which are used for that purpose only, are so many means by which we show how unchristian and unneighborly we can be. It is true these things are not usually done in any mere spirit of selfishness: they are the conventional forms of planting that come down to us from feudal times."

Not everyone, of course, agreed with Olmsted and Scott. Thorstein Veblen, in his 1899 The Summer Is Here!

Theory of the Leisure Class, saw the lawn as one more negative example of "conspicuous consumption." Lacy's collection offers several anti-lawn, pro-fence essays.

Jenkins notes that in the U.S. the first three patents for lawn mowers were issued in 1868. By 1881 the Patent Office had granted 138 patents for lawn mowers. In 1881, 47,661 lawn mowers were manufactured in the United States; fewer than one-half of one percent of households recorded in the 1880 census owned a mower.

Grasses that provided year-round lawn were not yet readily available. In the late 1880s, writes Jenkins, the federal government initiated a search for grass that would provide lawn in all of America's varied climates, and mailorder catalogs had begun to offer lawn-seed mixtures. The Sears, Roebuck catalog showed lawn-care equipment in its 1896 catalog. By 1900, by which time some 15 percent of the population lived in suburbs, many companies were selling grass-seed mixtures for different growing conditions.

Suburbia's second great expansion occurred in the 1920s, when Henry Ford's autos provided mobility needed for workers to live at a distance from their workplaces. Some idea of what these developments were like can be gathered from Sinclair Lewis's 1922 Babbitt, in which developer George F. Babbitt takes pride in his Zenith City suburb, Glen Oriole. He "ironed woodland and dipping meadow into a glenless, orioleless, sunburnt flat prickly with small boards announcing the names of imaginary streets."

As suburban developments proliferated, the front lawn that had been a luxury of the wealthy became a status symbol for the middle class. How important the appearance of these lawns were can be found in F. Scott Fitzgerald's 1925 The Great Gatsby. Nick Carraway has rented a small house near Jay Gatsby's estate on the fictional West Egg, Long Island. Carraway has not attended properly to his lawn. In Chapter Five, Gatsby, visiting Carraway, gazes across Carraway's unmown grass and then offers to send his yardman to mow Carraway's lengthy grass.

> "I want to get the grass cut," he said. We both looked at the grass there was a sharp line where my ragged lawn ended and the darker, well-kept expanse of his began.

This second expansion in acreage put into lawns, according to Jenkins, was also influenced by the growing popularity of golf. After the first permanent golf

A search began for grass species that would survive golfers' traffic. Collaboration between the United States Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Golf Association on grass research began early in the 1900s, with the USDA providing technical assistance to the USGA. By 1928 the USDA had 480 test plots in Arlington, Virginia, at the Arlington Turf Gardens, for trials of putting green grasses, fairway mixtures, turf diseases, and pests, fertilizers, for cutting and watering experiments, and tests of turf under various playing conditions. At the same time, USDA researchers also conducted experiments on grasses for home lawns. (After World War II, the USDA's Arlington facility was razed and the Pentagon built atop the old turf test plots.)

Between 1930 and World War II's end, new housing starts lapsed and few new lawns were put in. Using magazine articles and advertisements, Jenkins shows that despite the building slump, the lawn industry managed to hold on through the Depression and war by selling their turf

After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, grass seed, fertilizers, lawn mowers, gasoline, and rubber hoses were difficult for civilians to acquire. But these materials were available to the federal government, writes Jenkins, adding that during the war years

ins quotes from a USDA pamphlet — "A Message from Your Uncle Sam" published in January 1943. "In the Victory Garden campaign that is being planned for this year there is no thought of asking homeowners to spade up their front lawns or otherwise mutilate their ornamental plantings in order to grow vegetables. Too much of this kind of thing was done in the last war, and most of it paid pretty poor dividends."

After World War II, writes Jenkins, "American lawns were in bad shape." She quotes an article in the September 1945 issue of House and Garden: "The lawn is one of the saddest wartime casualties in the home garden. Annual feeding has been foregone and, in many instances lack of time has precluded even mowing. Consequently weeds are prevalent, the permanent grasses are being crowded out, the turf is thin, the sod probably run down, and insect damage has gone unchecked."

With World War II's end, writes Jenkins, the third and by far most widespread suburban development began. This development was financed by the federal government through Federal Housing Administration and Veterans Administration loans for mortgages and by government funding for highways. Builders like William Levitt, who raised 17,000 homes in his Levittown, Long Island, subdivision, drew on a tradition of uppermiddle-class suburban development and furnished their blue-collar tract housing with lawns.

By 1946, imported and hybrid grasses, new chemical fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides (many formulated by the War Department), lawn mowers, and lawn tools were soon on sale again to civilians. Jenkins notes that in 1941 Americans spent \$5 million on power lawn mowers; in 1950, Americans spent \$100 million on power lawn mowers. By 1960 the nearly 30 million home lawns in the United States were being added to at the rate of almost half a million a year, and the average American lawn covered about 1/13 of an acre.

From magazines published in the '50s and '60s, Jenkins uses advertisements and articles, the latter sometimes written by employees of companies who sold lawn-care supplies and equipment, to show that after World War II standards of perfection for lawn beauty continued to be raised. She shows, too, that these standards were impossible to reach and maintain without herbicides. fertilizers, and specialized equipment. "Lawns," Jenkins writes, "were not a need expressed by consumers that was then met by producers. The need was fos-



tered by producers, who continued to raise standards of what constituted a good lawn."

All along, of course, the unfenced American "front" lawn, like the American "front" room, offered opportunities for the lawn's owner to "put up a good front" and "keep up a good front." Jenkins notes that advertising, throughout the 20th century, increasingly equated a good lawn with good citizenship. As Americans became more mobile and less often knew neighbors, so a neat front yard more often became a sign that behind the picture window dwelled a virtuous family. Jenkins quotes from a 1969 Life essay that described lawn care as the one act by which Americans judge the moral fitness of fellow citizens. "You don't get to know your neighbors personally. You DO get to know how they keep their front yard. If you want to belong to the community fast, you conform."

The good lawn, however, has its price. Now, according to the Environmental Protection Agency, Americans dribble and spray some 70 million pounds of chemicals onto lawns each year. Again, according to the EPA, acre for acre, the American lawn receives four times as much chemical pesticide as the average U.S. farmland, with homeowners using higher concentrations of these chemicals than do most commercial farmers.

Jenkins doesn't believe that the front lawn as we know it is here to stay. She cites a 1991 *New York Times* Op-Ed piece by Michael Pollan, *Harper's* magazine editor and author of *Second Nature: A Gardener's Education*. Pollan chided then-President George Bush, who'd put himself forward as the "environmental President," for not doing more to earn that distinction. Pollan proposed that President Bush issue an executive order to the Park Service to rip out the White House lawn. Pollan suggested that the lawn be replaced by meadow, wetland (the White House grounds' original habitat), a vegetable garden managed according to organic principles that could supply food for Washington's poor, or an orchard of apple trees, underplanted with meadow grasses.

"A new landscape aesthetic is a cultural creation," Jenkins concludes, "and it remains to be seen whether the environmental movement in this country can enlist as potent a group of supporters for the 21st Century as the lawn industry, the U.S. Golf Association, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture did during the 20th Century."





And at the end of that year, the students, not I, decided to have a Watermelon Queen and Watermelon Drop. And I was asked to distribute a ballot to elect the Queen" — because all freshmen were required to take his physics class. "And so I made it the last page of the final exam. And then in a

fit of nonsense I proceeded to write an entire exam on watermelons. The myth is that I had an exam question about dropping a watermelon. It's not the case. It was an exam on electricity."

Why was it such a highpressure situation back in '65? "In starting up this campus, the idea was to attract very high-quality professors and give them a couple of years to get their research laboratories set up or whatever activities they were going to carry on. We all had a chance to get our research careers in line. The tradeoff was that some people came in with very little teaching experience. We were not very experienced at dealing with freshmen. And my joke about this is that we considered undergraduates to be 'shrunken graduate students' and treated them like that. And they sort of measured up. Give them a challenge and they'll meet it."

What does he think of the Watermelon Drop in terms of the culture at UCSD, a culture that has evolved into one wherein Ben Rothman wore a two-piece bikini made of watermelon rinds for his drop last year? "Well, it was understandable at the time. Those kids had to blow off steam. The screws were really put to them. They worked very hard. They were really a bright and interesting bunch of people, and I still see a couple of them to this day."

The professor did not comment further, sidestepping any declaration about the caliber of current students. He did, however, issue this disclaimer: "Professional historians say that the recollections of people from umpty-ump years ago are very unreliable. You'd best refer to printed things from the time. So consider my comments in that light."

What was his research area, anyway? "Experimental elementary-particle physics or high-energy physics." Nothing to do with watermelons. "Not a thing. That's condensed-matter physics." — Jeanne Schinto

OUTDOORS

Ocean Water Temperatures are rising into the mid- or high-60s this month, perhaps to reach the low 70s in July or August. The usual early-summer cool weather along San Diego's coastline, disappointing to many tourists, is mostly caused by the sluggish warming of the ocean water. The payoff will come later: as the ocean gives up heat absorbed during the sunny summer months, we'll enjoy warm days and evenings well into autumn.

Early June's Exceptional Lowest Tides are for early risers only! Check out the local tidepool life without hordes of other people around. Friday, June 4, features a minus-1.9foot tide (about as low as it ever gets) at 5:19 a.m. Saturday, June 5, brings a minus-1.7-foot tide at 6:12 a.m. Wake up on Sunday, June 6, for a minus-1.4-foot tide at 7:07 a.m., no longer very early but not as low a tide as on Friday or Saturday.

Grunion Runs may occur near or after the midnight hour this Friday, Saturday, and Sunday evenings, June 4-6. This corresponds to 1-2 hours after highest nocturnal tide, 2-5 days after the date of full moon, which was June 2. The small, silvery grunion tend to spawn on wide, gently sloping beaches such as Silver

Strand, Mission Beach, Pacific Beach, La Jolla Shores, and Del Mar. California law allows the taking of grunion in summer by those possessing a state fishing license. The grunion must be caught by the hands only and should be eaten (not wasted).

Spring Wildflowers may have largely dried up in most areas of San Diego County, but in the cooler coastal enclaves such as Cabrillo National Monument and Torrey Pines State Reserve, several kinds remain. Look for paintbrush, purple nightshade, coreopsis, sea fig, popcorn flower, and red monkey flower, among others.

Western Azalea, a native rhododendron, is blooming this month in scattered locations throughout the county's higher mountains. Fond of semi-shade, it's often found growing along creeks and canyon bottoms. Like its ornamental cousins, western azalea's fragrant white (sometimes pink or yellow tinted) flowers are borne in ornate clusters. Palomar Mountain State Park harbors a colony of them alongside a trail linking Doane Valley and Chimney Flats. White-flowering azaleas will undoubtedly appear again along the Azalea Glen Trail in Cuyamaca Rancho State Park, but it may take several years before that fire-damaged landscape sufficiently returns to life.





A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond • By Jerry Schad

Wright's Field, just south of Alpine's commercial district, is a refreshing bit of open space plunked down amid East County's growing rural and suburban development. Alpine's homegrown Back Country Land Trust has managed to purchase 230 acres of rolling grassland and oaks here so far. The nonprofit organization is currently seeking funds to add another contiguous 141 acres of undeveloped natural habitat to the existing protected area. Although small in area compared to neighboring Cleveland National Forest lands, Wright's Field preserve will likely become an

important site for wildlife, rare plants, and local recreation in the years to come.

Hikers are welcome to tramp around the site, which has seen much use by both hikers and equestrians in recent years. To get there, exit Interstate 8 at Tavern Road, and follow Tavern just over one mile south to MacQueen Middle School on the left. Find a space to park along Tavern Road in front of or near the middle school. On foot, follow the residential private road going east along the school's

northside fence for 0.2 mile until you reach its dead-end. Continue through a gap and into Wright's Field preserve.

From this point on, for a looping route of 1.5 miles (more or less, depending on your exact route), bear a little left, following a narrow footpath. Continue working your way clockwise all the way around the perimeter of the treeless meadow known as Wright's Field. Pick and choose your route amid many intersecting dirt roads and trails.

The grasses here are a mixture of native bunchgrass and exotic imports such as wild oats and filaree. Grav-green Engelmann oaks dot the edge of the meadow and can be seen growing on the rocky slopes above the meadow's eastern edge. Other common vegetation includes toyon shrubs; white sage (notice the pungent scent); California sagebrush (notice the sweet-pun-

Near the beginning of your clockwise circling of the meadow, look for a straight row of rounded boulders on the right. the bare remnants of stone walls belonging to a Spanish rancho that dates back to 1840 or earlier. Here and there along the route vou'll get fine vistas of the regional landscape, including Viejas and El Cajon mountains, both looking a little stark in the aftermath of last year's Cedar Fire.

You'll optimize your visit to Wright's Field if you confine your exploration to early morning or late afternoon/early evening. when long shadows drape across the sensuous contours of the meadow. The spring season here is typically characterized by morning coolness and sometimes fog, followed by midday heat, followed by a brisk, cooling west wind late in the day.





Alger Hiss's Looking-Glass Wars: The Covert Life of a Soviet Spy

FROM THE DUST JACKET: For decades, a great number of Americans saw Alger Hiss as an innocent victim of McCarthyism — a distinguished diplomat railroaded by an ambitious Richard Nixon. And even as the case against Hiss grew over time, his dignified demeanor helped create an aura of innocence that outshone the facts in many minds.

e Now G. Edward White deftly

draws together the countless details of Hiss's life — from his upper-middle-class childhood in Baltimore and his brilliant success at Harvard to his later career as a self-made martyr to McCarthyism — to paint a fascinating portrait of a man whose life was devoted to perpetuating a lie. White catalogs the evidence that proved Hiss's guilt, from Whittaker Chambers's famous testimony, to copies of State Department documents typed on Hiss's typewriter, to Allen Weinstein's groundbreaking investigation in the 1970s. The author then explores the central conundrums of Hiss's life: Why did this talented lawyer become a Communist

and a Soviet spy? Why did he devote so much of his life to an extensive public campaign to deny his espionage? And how, without producing any new evidence, did he convince many people that he was innocent? White offers a compelling analysis of Hiss's behavior in the face of growing evidence of his guilt, revealing how this behavior fit into an ongoing pattern of denial and duplicity in his life.

The story of Alger Hiss is in part a reflection of Cold War America — a time of ideological passions, partisan battles, and secret lives. It is also a story that transcends a particular historical era a story about individuals who choose to engage in espionage for foreign powers and the secret worlds they choose to conceal. In White's hands, the life of Alger Hiss comes to illuminate both of those themes.

WHAT THE CRITICS SAY:

From *Publishers Weekly:* White is the son-in-law of the late John F. Davis, who served as Alger Hiss's counsel during a 1948 appearance before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Nevertheless, White, a professor at the University of Virginia Law School, cuts Hiss little slack, portraying him as that perhaps most base of creatures: an unrepentant and lifelong liar. As White clearly shows, Hiss not only lived a lie as a State Department official in the secret employ of the Soviets, but also thereafter, through decades of denial in the face of ever-mounting evidence. White contends that, as the years rolled on, Hiss found his raison d'être in the useless charade of seeking vindication. White argues that had Hiss not maintained his innocence, "he would have been just one other undercover agent who had lied, betrayed his country, and gotten caught."

From *Booklist*: The 1990s were rough on defenders of Alger Hiss. Historians such as John Earl Haynes and Harvey Klehr (*Venona*, 1999) found damning evidence against Hiss in American and Soviet intelligence files. Accepting the conclusion that Hiss was a Soviet spy, White tells how Hiss conducted his campaign of innocence and explores

why he undertook it when he inwardly knew he was duping supporters. A notable biographer of Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, White detects in Hiss's clerkship for Holmes a skill at manipulation foreshadowing the future; White argues that even some of Hiss's lawyers in his perjury trials of 1949 and 1950 doubted their client's truthfulness. Yet Hiss never wavered in public, reiterating his own defense to sympathetic journalists and college audiences, in which his own character was burnished as sterling and that of accuser Whittaker Chambers was tarnished.

From the *New York Times*: If you are too young to care much about Alger Hiss, move on. Turn away also if you recall the case and still believe Hiss never fed secrets to Soviet agents. But if you accept Hiss's guilt, as most historians now do, you will profit from G. Edward White's supplementary speculations about why, after prison, that serene and charming man sacrificed his marriage, exploited a son's love, and abused the trust of fervent supporters to wage a 42year struggle for a vindication that could never be honestly gained.

White is a legal scholar at the University of Virginia, but in *Alger Hiss's Looking-Glass Wars*, he is not just parsing legal evidence. Inspired by a chance family connection to Hiss, he felt a need to ruminate on two enduring mysteries: why Hiss persisted in his lying and why he managed to fool so many Americans for so long. White's answers, in a useful supplement to the vast Hiss literature, are plausible but beyond proof.

From *Commentary*: In many ways, White's book advances the work of three previous studies — Allen Weinstein's *Perjury* (1978), Sam Tanenhaus's *Whittaker Chambers: A Life* (1997), and most recently, John Earl Haynes and Harvey Klehr's *Venona: Decoding Soviet Espionage in America* (1999). But it also goes further.

White begins with a careful and somewhat skeptical investigation into Hiss's background. This was far less genteel than the diplomat-spy would have others believe. Even as a young man, White shows, Hiss knew how to deceive and manipulate, partly (continued on page 86)

through immense charm, partly through a remarkable degree of self-possession that translated into a formidable power of intimidation.

Despite his less than royal roots, Hiss's professional ascent was dazzling. After graduating from Johns Hopkins and Harvard Law School, where he became a protégé of Professor (later Justice) Felix Frankfurter, Hiss served for a time as secretary to former Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, went to New Deal Washington to serve in the Agricultural Adjustment Agency, and then worked as an aide to Senator Gerald Nve, who conducted a sensational (or rather. sensationalistic) investigation of U.S. armament manufacturers. He finally moved to the State Department, eventually rising to become a key aide to FDR's Secretary of State, Edward Stettinius.

Hiss was at Yalta with Roosevelt and at the San Francisco founding conference of the United Nations. He was openly being spoken of as a future American Secretary of State. Yet, in 1946, he quietly left the government for the Carnegie Endowment in order to avoid confronting certain rumors and suspicions that had floated to the surface following a number of defections from the Soviet spy network. Had Whittaker Chambers held his tongue, Hiss would in all likelihood have ended his career unblemished and full of honors.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR: From his office at the University of Virginia, where he is the David and Mary Harrison Distinguished Professor in the School of Law, G. Edward White said that he was born in Northampton, Massachusetts, in 1941. "In March." "I grew up in the Northeast.

My mother was a high school English teacher. My father was an English professor at Amherst, and then after the Second World War he ended up in the Merchant Marine and didn't go back to teaching. We moved to the New York area.

"We had a family structure — my mother, father, sister, and me — that doesn't exist a lot anymore. We hadn't been able to do it with our children; our children are grown. But we actually would sit down at the dinner table and have literary discussions."

"What heaven."

"My father ended up in the publishing business and was in the publishing business for much of his life when I was growing up, and he liked to come home and sit down at the dinner table and talk about books and ideas." "What fun. And you prob-

ably had a real dinner." "Yes, we had a real dinner.

We didn't have television for many years. By the time we got television, I was ready to go away to school. I had what would now be regarded as an old-fashioned childhood in a number of respects. I don't regret that at all. I wish my children had had more of an old-fashioned childhood."

"Did your parents discuss Alger Hiss?"

"Actually, no. At least I can't remember any discussion. My parents weren't particularly political. I don't remember, for example, any discussion with them when I was growing up about the Cold War or the threat from the Soviets. I do remember that in the 1952 election, my father was not inclined to vote for Adlai Stevenson because he thought Stevenson was an intellectual, and his experience with intellectuals was that they weren't grounded in reality, and they wouldn't make good politicians or statesmen. I think that both of them voted for Eisenhower in the '52 and '56 elections."

"You weren't a Red Diaper baby."

"I certainly wasn't. I was the opposite. It was a conservative lifestyle, where many of my friends went to boarding school. In the New York area at that time in the '50s, there was a certain amount of social stratification. It was more important to my parents' generation than it was to my generation. We lived in Long Island. And Long Island, the North Shore of Long Island, was a stratified community. I was quite happy to bail out of that world at some point.

and then Amherst College and then Yale. I got a master's and Ph.D. in American studies at Yale, and then I went to law school at Harvard. So I spent a lot of time in the New England academic institutions."

Professor White was admitted to the bar in 1970. "I was 29 when I graduated from law school, and then I went out to the American Bar Foundation in Chicago for a year. I was a visiting scholar. I was thinking of becoming a law professor, but in order to become a law professor in those days, it was helpful to get a Supreme Court clerkship. I applied to all the members of the Court. I wasn't the usual candidate from Harvard Law School, in that I wasn't first or second in my class.'

In 1971 Mr. White was hired by Earl Warren ("Earl Warren," the professor laughed, "and I have the same birthday, 50 years apart"), who had retired in 1969 as chiefjustice of the United States Supreme Court. "I was very grateful to him. It made it easier for me to get into teaching law because of that. But it



was an odd year in the sense that he didn't really know what to do with himself.

"He probably hired me because I'd done some writing before I'd gone to law school, and he possibly thought I might help him with his memoirs. But he didn't really want to work on his memoirs. What he did for most of the year was accept speaking invitations. I wrote speeches for him, which was not fun. He hated writing speeches, and so his idea of getting started on writing a speech was to get his law clerk to draft something and then tear it apart. So that's pretty much what I did."

"Where was Justice Warren living in 1971?"

"In the Sheraton Hotel in Washington. He had been living in the Sheraton ever since he became chief justice. The reason for that was when he moved from California he didn't like the prices of real estate in Washington. So he thought that he and Nina Warren, his wife, would just take an apartment and see. And they never moved out of the apartment. But he spent a lot of time, when he could, on the West Coast."

Our talk turned to the professor's newest book. I confessed that as a child I was terrified by photographs of the snaggletoothed, vastly overweight, sloppyappearing Chambers that appeared in newspapers and magazines.

"Well, he was a scary-looking person. Of course, Hiss is elegant looking, and Chambers is someone a young person might well think was scary looking." "I think that Chambers made

many people uncomfortable." "Yes, he was an erratic per-

sonality. I don't know whether you ever looked at his book, *Witness.*"

"I did. I read it."

"It's very overwritten." "Stylistically, it's close to Thomas Wolfe's novels."

"Yes, right, it's that sort of genre. It's very purple. And that, combined with his eccentric behavior and the fact that he'd been a member of the Communist Party, and then all of a sudden turns around and denounces them — it's pretty consistent with the idea that this guy is a little bit strange, maybe not all there. I think this affected his case from the beginning."

"I think that both Chambers and Elizabeth Bentley, the 'Red Spy Queen,' and an informer were what our parents would have called 'neurotic.' "

"Right, they both had that affect. Did you ever read Elizabeth Bentley's *Out of Bondage: How an American College Girl Became Involved with the Communist Party — and How She Escaped*"?

"Yes."

"It's not as good as Chambers's book, but it has the same quality of being overwritten." We talked a bit about Chambers's and Bentley's reli-

gious bent. "Chambers, a Quaker, was deeply religious," said Professor White. "In fact, his conversion and his attachment to religion is the source of his friendship with William Buckley. They both had this kind of conversion experience. That enabled Chambers to demonize the Soviets after he defected from them, so that he sees them as evil incarnate in part because they're godless."

"Why do you think it was that people like my liberal father — who died in 1987 remained convinced of Hiss's innocence?"

"Well, there are a lot of factors that go into it. One has to do with politics. On the whole, Hiss manages to convert the controversy over his innocence into a question of whether you are a zealous. anti-Communist rightwinger or whether you're a liberal. So in some ways people that had their roots in the liberal Democratic parties, in the politics of the New Deal, but who were anti-Communist as well, felt embarrassed by the fact that all of a sudden there, in the same camp, as far as being anti-Communist, were people like Joe McCarthy and the House Un-American Committee.

So part of it is by thinking that Hiss might well have been framed, you declare your independence of the right wing of the anti-Communist movement. That's one thing. Another thing is that Hiss had this effect -I didn't call it the Hiss effect in the book, but I should really. Every time anybody went out to lunch with him or had a relatively one-on-one relationship with him, they were impressed, remarkably impressed. He projected an aura of modesty and evenhandedness and graciousness. He was a remarkable person."

"For me, what your book is about is how the belief in his innocence managed to survive. Down through generations, like a family story."

"Yes, it's really a book about how people didn't want to let go of the illusion of his innocence because there's so much tied up in that illusion. It's how they feel about Nixon, how they feel about Hoover, how they feel about the Cold War."

"Really even how they feel about both Hoovers."

"Right, how you feel about the New Deal. How you feel about your own possible flirtation with left-wing ideologies in the '30s, when lots of people were considering socialism or some form of popular-front Communism. And so they sort of remember that.

"There's even a certain amount of nostalgia for that, and by the time the '60s and '70s come around, people think, 'Gosh, you know, maybe the late '60s and early '70s are something like the Second Coming — of ideologies that are not liberal but left of liberal.' "

"You note in your book that the '60s brought Hiss an entire new group of devotees and believers."

"Yes. There's this marvelous scene in one of the films that came out. It's by longtime Hiss supporter John Lowenthal [*The Trials of Alger Hiss*]. The Lowenthal film ends with Hiss giving a lecture at a college, a university, and the film begins and ends with him in that role. At the end of the film, a student from the audience says, 'Mr. Hiss, you know, now that you've been cleared, are you planning to go back and enter politics?' And Hiss says, 'Well, gosh, you know, I'm 70 years old, it's an achievement for me to just walk across the stage.' He says that wryly; he's perfectly fit at that time.

"So the student not only believes that Hiss is innocent. but he believes that everybody has decided that Hiss is innocent. and of course therefore Hiss. because he's been cleared, would be a legitimate person to be involved in national politics. It's just an astonishing moment. This guy has not produced a shred of new evidence suggesting that he's been less than culpable. All he's really done is persistently maintain his innocence and remind others to 'look at my accusers.

"He really did make it work, and part of the way he made it work was to be very shrewd about when it was propitious for him to make a very public statement of his innocence. And when it was propitious for him to be relatively low key."

"I think Hiss had a very romantic view of Communism."

"He just didn't stop and see the error of his ways when Chambers accused him, he remained supportive of the Soviets the entire remainder of his life. He wasn't somebody that dropped out - he wasn't like Wilfred Blunt, who realized it was kind of a pain in the neck, being an agent, and he wasn't that effective anyway. Alger Hiss would have continued to be an agent if he had a position that the Soviets had been interested in. I'm convinced of that. But they weren't interested in somebody who had gotten caught."

Hiss, after he finished his prison sentence, went to work for a stationery concern. I said that I bet he was very good at the stationery business.

Professor White agreed. "I bet he was very good too. What he said in his memoirs was that people would talk to him because of who he was. They would just be fascinated. Here's Alger Hiss selling stationery, and he would take advantage of that. He would charm them and end up making a sales pitch."

"I bet he remembered code names for all the envelopes and paper clips."

"He had an absolutely formidable memory for detail. One thing, too, about Alger Hiss: he would have probably been a fairly officious control freak as a boss. He was really never a boss of anybody. And he was very good at being the ingratiating underling to his superiors."

"How did you feel about Hiss before you did the book?"

"I had two stages in my feelings about him. Before I read Allen Weinstein's book, *Perjury*, in the 1970s, I was inclined to think that Hiss was innocent. I didn't have any particular reason for that other than people that I knew tended to think he was innocent. John Davis, my fatherin-law, had represented him, and John thought he was innocent.

"Then I read Weinstein's book, and subsequently I saw Weinstein in a public performance in Washington. I was very unimpressed with Weinstein in his public performance. I thought he was not a particularly solid person, but I also thought that everything about Allen Weinstein made me think that he would be inclined to support Hiss, that he would go into the book wanting to support Hiss. So the fact that he had come out of it not supporting Hiss made me think that there was really something in this. And so I then started talking with John Davis about Hiss.'

"John Davis must have been wonderful."


"Yes, I couldn't have had a better father-in-law. We had a very good relationship for many years. John was completely unimpressed with Weinstein. Weinstein had interviewed him for the book. John just thought Weinstein had an agenda. He wasn't convinced by the book. So he and I began to bat this back and forth. And the more we did, the more I decided that John's views really needed to be discounted because John was Hiss's lawyer, and John really believed in his client, and it would have been kind of shocking for John to concede the fact that Hiss was not only guilty, but he'd been lying to his lawyers.

"Weinstein had some evidence from the Hiss defense files, and I started thinking about that evidence. I wasn't really planning on writing on Hiss. I was doing other things, but John and I continued to talk about the Hiss case. And then in the '90s things began to change. You know, first there was that Volkogonov story about clearing him. I thought that was preposterous when it came out. I thought this guy has looked in one archive, this doesn't make sense. But I didn't see the retraction. And the retraction wasn't widely publicized. There was an article in the Times about it, but I didn't see it. Then, some of the Soviet archives came out, and then Venona came out."

About the Venona Project, Professor White writes that it took place "during a brief period during the Second World War when American intelligence had broken the codes of Soviet transmissions from Washington and New York to Moscow. The codebreaking project, known by insiders by the name Venona, had apparently been engineered by the United States' National Security Agency."

"Venona," I said, "changed everything."

"Well, what Venona did, was Venona provided independent corroboration for other information that had come out but that had all been anecdotal. There were just a lot of people who had evidence, but you thought it was all anecdotal; it was always something a little strange about them. And then all of a



sudden you've got the Soviets cabling each other and mentioning, not just Hiss, but tons of people. And then the whole picture changes.

"In 1996, Hiss is still alive. And the Venona stuff comes out, and they ask him about it. And he's not in great health at that point, but he says, 'Oh, there's nothing in it. You know, I went to Moscow to look at the subway.' " (After the Yalta Conference, Hiss visited the USSR.)

"Nothing in it? I mean, there was tons of stuff in it. And so, the funny thing is that after Venona came out and precipitated another book by Weinstein, and then a book by Sam Tanenhaus called Whittaker Chambers: A Biography, there was by the late '90s this consensus that Hiss was a Soviet agent. But then, notwithstanding that, the Alger Hiss website [http://homepages.nyu.edu/~th15/ home.html] continues to maintain Hiss's innocence. I would be astonished if you find any reference on that website to my book or any reviews of my book.

"Tony Hiss [Alger's son and a *New Yorker* staff writer]," I said, "wrote quite a nasty letter to the *Sunday New York Times Book Review* about your book after the *Times* reviewed it."

The professor had not read the letter. "Well, I was expecting something, but I'm interested that he took that form to do it. I figured he might try to commission a review in The Nation or something. I bet he hated the book, but I'll bet he particularly didn't like that I suggest that his father, Alger, took advantage of him at a vulnerable stage in his life. That's not very flattering. I actually feel sorry for Tony, but I don't feel sorry for Alger. It was a contemptible thing for Alger to do."

"Now that you're older, how do you feel about Whittaker Chambers? I still don't like him."

"I don't think I would like him. I think being in his company would be very awkward. I think he was a neurotic person." "I think I'd have to have a

drink." "I might be inclined to do that as well. I also don't really think that he had the greatest motives in the world for exposing Hiss. I don't think he wanted

motives in the world for exposing Hiss. I don't think he wanted to expose Hiss's espionage. I think he kept those papers [the Pumpkin Papers] to protect himself against the Soviets. It just happened to be the case that the papers were typed on Hiss's

typewriter.

"I think that when he was subpoenaed to come to the House Un-American Activities Committee meeting he was already a converted anti-Communist, and he welcomed the opportunity to name names. I think he did that in part because of his conversion. But I think he was a very reluctant witness about espionage. I think what he was not a reluctant witness about was these people who were at one point Communists. Because I think what he hopes they'll do is renounce Communism.

"So the espionage charge by Chambers comes because Hiss sues him for libel. If Hiss hadn't sued him for libel. I'm not sure that those papers would have come to light. I think the papers came to light because Chambers — who, remember, was genuinely concerned that he might lose a substantial libel suit. He might not be able to prove the allegations that he made about Hiss. So he goes back and remembers these papers and looks through these papers, and I'm not even sure he knows - he said he didn't know-what was in the papers. I'm inclined to believe him.

"But I think that but for Nixon's persistence it's possible that the Hiss investigation would never have gotten off the ground. He's the one who sandbagged Hiss and set up that interview in New York [in a room at the Commodore Hotel] where Hiss makes a very bad account of himself. Hiss goes through this charade about trying to identify Chambers. It's unconvincing. He's testy. He acts like somebody who has gotten caught with his hand in the cookie jar."

"One aspect of the Hiss-Chambers imbroglio that is rarely mentioned and that seems important is this matter of social class. Hiss was 'one of ours.' Chambers wasn't."

"True. It was, and that's ironic because Hiss himself was a kind of *faux* upper class." "Hiss," I suggested, "was

"Hiss," I suggested, "was like somebody who had studied *The Preppy Handbook*. I do think it was a class thing. I think that there was a definite identification of West Side intellectuals and college professors, people who, simply as a matter of class. identified with Hiss. He went to 'our' schools. He dressed like us. He wore rep ties. He had good teeth." "Right, and Nixon and

Hoover and Chambers are one of them. They're coarse, their..." "...teeth are bad."

"They're barbarians at the gate."

"Hiss's discussion — in public testimony — of Chambers's terrible teeth stunned me the first time I read about that conversation."

"According to Chambers," said the professor, "when he and Hiss were intimate friends, Hiss gave him lectures on getting his teeth fixed. Because, of course, appearances are so important for Hiss. He's always dressed to the nines.

"So, yes, I also think that about class. I think that all of that came together in the environment that I was in, in Harvard Law School in the late '60s. You've got, first of all, at that time in its history, a predominantly liberal institution. Almost everybody on the faculty and most of the student body regard themselves as political liberals, not everyone but many. You've also got a strong influence of class. Many people who go there are Ivy League college graduates, and they were people that had gone to prep school, and then, finally, you've got, at that point in the politics of both the Democratic and Republican Parties, some upper-class figures." "I think there are many people who still believe in Hiss's innocence."

"Yes. There have been quite a few reviews that have come out that I've seen. They're all sort of newspaper reviews. There's a theme of the reviews that I didn't anticipate, which is, 'Well, now that White's book has come out, maybe we've seen the last of this.' You know. 'Thank goodness. Maybe this is the end.'

"I didn't write the book with that in mind. I wrote the book to try to explain things and stimulate people to think more about Hiss, not to bury him. Partly this could be explained by the fact that many people that have written these reviews are people that are familiar with the Hiss case, and maybe they're tired of having to write about Hiss, and they hope that this will be the end. They also don't think there's much ambiguity anymore about the issues. But I wrote the book because I didn't think any of the existing literature on the Hiss case had addressed the issues that I talked about.

"I actually hoped to encourage people to talk more about that. Not necessarily about Alger Hiss, but about how people get fooled. About how perception is so important in skewing views of historical events."

"The Hiss case," I suggested, "is replete with decisions based upon perceptions rather than facts. Whittaker Chambers is hideously dressed, overweight, snaggletoothed, stuttering. There's the darkbearded, almost mysterious Nixon, who did dirt to a liberal female in his first election foray. There are the intimations that Chambers had homosexual longings for Hiss."

"That was a fabricated story that the Hiss defense team tried to turn to their advantage. Chambers had, in fact, had some homosexual episodes. I don't believe that Alger Hiss had any homosexual tendencies at all."

"The Commies in those days didn't care for homosexuals." "Sure, they thought people could be blackmailed."

"They were right."

"Although," said Professor White, "that didn't keep them from recruiting several of the

Not the Whole Story

Life on earth is absolutely valueless.

he Netherlands Bach Society gave a thrilling concert at Sherwood Auditorium, under the auspices of the San Diego Early Music Society (presumably on the principle that one good society deserves another). Among instru-

mental and vocal ensembles specializing in Baroque music, there is none better. The instrumentalists (three violins, viola, cello, two recorders, and a con-

tinuo group made up variously of bassoon, theorbo, harpsichord, organ, and double bass) are masters of their art, at once virtuosic and expressive. The eight singers on the current tour are remarkable in that each has a voice of soloist quality. Jos van Veldhoven, music director since 1983, is one of the world's foremost conductors of this repertoire, with an impeccable sense of style, and the kind of discipline and vitality that inspires musicians.

The vividness of the instruments and voices and the perfection of their balance uncannily made the rather dry and colorless auditorium sound like a much larger, more resonant hall indeed, like one of the German churches in which the items in the program had been originally performed. If you closed your eyes, you could have imagined yourself in St. Thomas's in Leipzig, during the time of Johann Schelle, Johann Kuhnau, and Johann Sebastian Bach, successively cantors (that is, directors of music) of that august center of musical life in Saxony.

It would have been an appropriate fantasy, for the organizing principle of the program was "Bach and His Musical Heritage," which meant not only J.S. Bach's predecessors in Leipzig (their closeness was suggested by a motet of Kuhnau's for which Bach composed the instrumental accompaniment), but also his great-uncle Johann (who was organist at Erfurt in the 17th Century), and - at a greater geographical distance, but an intimate source of musical inspiration — the great north German composer Dietrich Buxtehude. The works were all liturgical (cantatas and motets), except for an exquisitely shaped and voiced performance of the Fourth Brandenburg Concerto, the only purely instrumental piece on the program.

How the liturgical works ought to be per-

formed remains a vexed question. The problem is one of numbers: how many voices or instruments on a part should there be — for example, in a cantata of Kuhnau or Bach? Above all, ought there to be a clear distinction

> of persons and numbers between vocal soloists and chorus, or is there some more suitable way to handle their relationship? Van Veldhoven evidently believes

that single voices are enough to establish the sound of a chorus, especially if they are balanced against a minimal orchestra, and that the clarity and character thus gained far outweighs any possible loss of heft. Soloists in recitatives and arias are drawn from the vocal ensemble, stepping out of it or back into it when the music requires. Furthermore, with eight singers at his disposal, the conductor can achieve lovely antiphonal effects by disposing them on both sides of the stage, and creating a special dynamic of spatial interaction that gives variety and energy to the performance.

Often, this type of interaction is implied or explicitly stated in the score. A notable example was Johann Bach's Unser Leben ist ein Schatten, which the composer specifies as being for two choruses (plus basso continuo), the first numbering six, and the second numbering three, with the latter "hidden" (that is, placed in a different part of the hall). I'm not quite sure how van Veldhoven dealt with the missing voice (since in principle he needed nine), but he made clever use of the geography of Sherwood Auditorium, placing the threevoice group in the lobby at the rear of the hall, framed in the open central doorway. This is altogether a remarkable piece of music (you can already hear the Bach-family genius at work), and part of its subtlety - in structure and expression — depends on the varied interactions of the large and small groupings (as well as another three-voice group within the larger chorus), with responses and echoes coming from different directions in successive sections of the motet.

The exciting spatial complexity serves to underline (and perhaps to undermine) the message of the text, which is one of those unequivocal statements of German Baroque pietism according to which life on earth is absolutely valueless, and all the faithful Christian's thoughts should be on the eternal life to come, guaranteed by faith in Jesus:

Ach, wie flüchtig, ach, wie nichtig Ist der Menschen Leben, Wie ein Nebel bald entstehet Und bald wiederum vergehet So ist unser Leben, sehet!


"Ah how fleeting, ah how insignificant Is the life of mortals, As a mist quickly arises And as quickly dissipates So is our life, behold!"

The images in this text are given palpable presence, sometimes by specific word-painting, sometimes by the relentless tread of the melody, sometimes by the echoed phrases passing across the hall. Perhaps the Lutheran congregation experiencing the work somewhere around 1650 were convinced. But after the service they would go home and eat a hearty lunch, and then busily occupy themselves with the day-to-day activities of work, family, love-making, money-making, and civic duty, all of which they knew to be fleeting and insignificant. They were supposed to keep their mind on death, but I'll bet anything they thought a lot about life. And those of them with aesthetic awareness must have taken lively pleasure in the talent and ingenuity of the composer who had brought them this message of mor-

tality, and in the voices (and maybe even the looks) of the performers, just the way the audience in Sherwood Auditorium was to do three and a half centuries later. Ah, the paradox of human nature!

One could not help being aware of this paradox at a concert like that of the Netherlands Bach Society, if one paid any attention to what the singers were singing and what the music meant. The message was reiterated in an even more extreme form in J.S. Bach's Cantata, BWV 161, *Komm, du süsse Todesstunde* ("Come, you sweet hour of death"), where the soul, longing to be with Christ, vigorously demands to die as soon

> as possible: "I wish for the burden of my body to be laid this very day in earth...O Jesus! Come and take me away! Let this be my last word." Yet Bach sets the text of this cantata to the loveliest and most serene music, even giving it a cheerful, pastoral flavor by the delicate chirruping of two recorders. The setting is altogether orthodox, and no doubt sincerely meant by everyone involved. But how sensual the music is (like all the arts of the Baroque), how fine the achievements of the composer and the musicians are, how much artfully crafted earthly substance (the instruments, the training, the rehearsals, the architectural beauties of the church chancel) went

into the execution of this work of art that so confidently wants to throw it all away and leave it all behind, the quicker the better!

Naturally, the audience here could experience only the art of this great composition, not its historical context, nor the purpose for which it was created. Sherwood Auditorium of the Museum of Contemporary Art, La Jolla, is not the court chapel in Weimar (where BWV 161 was first performed in 1715), and those lovers of early music attending the concert did not constitute a congregation of worshipers. But to get the full impact of the music, the listener could use his imagination, and try to reinfuse the aesthetic experience with at least a hint of the fervent religiosity that made Salomo Franck's words and Bach's setting of them a functioning element in a living community's sense of itself, and in each individual's vision of what kind of creature he is and what his destiny holds in store for him.

The performers, with their passionate and skillful efforts to bring the past alive, were certainly doing their part. ■





These Nice Folks

The milestones are predictable: shy honeymoon; teenage son who may have drained a pint of Jack Daniel's; Michael having a lover...

gnes is eight months pregnant. She's calm. But husband Michael's Sympathy Pain Central: he palpitates, swoons, his heart bass drums. "That's okay," Agnes tries to assure him, "this has been going on for millions and millions of years."

To which Michael, breathless, replies, "I don't see how the men lived through it!"

When Agnes observes that having children will consume their free time, what with changing diapers and all, Michael smiles. "Well, I'll find *something* to do," he says.

Harvey Schmidt and Tom Jones based their 1966 musical, *I Do! I Do!*, on Jan De Hartog's play *The Fourposter. I Do!* chronicles events in the 50-year marriage of Michael and Agnes. He's a writer with literary aspirations. She's a "traditional" housewife. The milestones are predictable: shy honeymoon; teenage son who may have drained a pint of Jack Daniel's; Michael having a lover; vengeful Agnes vowing to "flame" the town red; older age; and finally leaving their home of five decades.

Through it all, we never get to know much about Michael or Agnes. The less the better, from the authors' point of view. Schmidt and Jones wrote *The Fantasticks*, which applied the barestage minimalism of *Our Town* to a musical. There's a boy and a girl, a wall, a trunk, parents. The kids grow from innocence to experience. *I*



Do! has a generic husband and wife, and a bed, center stage. They grow from wide-eyed illusion to disillusionment (as if the authors had grafted a marriage onto *Fantasticks*). Their characters don't have much "character." Details are kept to

a minimum, by design, so audiences can plug their own experiences into the story and songs.

This bird's-eye view tempers potential crises. Like the Neil Simon comedies of the period, bad things just *seem to happen* to these nice folks. The ironies have all been pretested. And theirs is a low-wire act, with a sitcom safety net below.

Michael sings the only song that threatens anything, "It's a Well-Known Fact." Men, he contends, age better than women (he claims to be a "late-October rose"), and women "fizzle." The night I caught the show, the Fritz Theater's lively audience wasn't buying that sexist hoo-hah any more than when Agnes sings a "woman's only alive when she's in love."

Yes, the Fritz, famous heretofore for tough, cutting-edge drama, especially about women. *I Do! I Do!* — a compendium of mid-'60s main-stream cliches — is a far cry from Paula Vogel's *Baltimore Waltz* or the scalding truths of Maria Irene Fornes.

Duane Daniels, artistic director of the Fritz, also has musical theater talents (he's one of the

main reasons *Triple Espresso* has run for what seems like forever at the Hahn). As Michael, Daniels combines his rich baritone voice with Leigh Scarritt's silver soprano. They are always fun to watch, and hear, even if the musical isn't. In the original, the vocals were so demanding staccato riffs verging on pure scat — Robert Preston and Mary Martin performed only six (rather than eight) shows a week. Daniels and Scarritt sprint through these tongue-twisters with dexterity and perform the show's signature song, "My Cup Runneth Over" with heart.

I Do! is part of a dinner-theater package at the Sixth Avenue Bistro's intimate downstairs





cabaret: bar, round tables, small stage, and launchedrocket accoustics.

Sheer territorial chauvinism: This Sunday, June 6, Channel 8 will telecast the Tony Awards from Radio City Music Hall. The ceremony, which begins at 8:00 p.m. local time, could be subtitled "the San Diego Showcase." With pride let's count the ways:

Jack O'Brien, artistic director of the Old Globe, has been nominated for his direction of Shakespeare's Henry IV, a Lincoln Center production that originated at the Globe in 1995. This is O'Brien's sixth nomination. He won last year's Tony for directing the Broadway hit Hairspray.

The Drama Desk Awards voted on by New York critics and editors - are to the Tonys what the Wood Memorial used to be to the Kentucky Derby. Success in one predicted success in the other. O'Brien won this year's Drama Desk and Outer Critics Circle awards for Henry IV.

Also nominated for Henry IV: Globe associate artist Ralph Funicello for scenic design. Dakin Matthews, who adapted both parts of Henry IV into a single play, received a special Drama Desk Award.

Doug Wright's I Am My Own Wife inaugurated the La Jolla Playhouse's popular work-in-progress series, Page to Stage, in 2001. Wife won this year's Pulitzer Prize for drama, and a Drama Desk. It has been nominated for three Tonys: Best Play, Wright; Best Direction, Moises Kaufman; and Best Performance by a Leading Actor: UCSD graduate Jefferson Mays, who has already won the Drama Desk for his astonishing solo performance.

Don Juan

This one's special. Unlike so many restagings of old comedies, Stephen Wadsworth isn't doing something to Molière's Don Juan. He's doing the play, as played, in period. Audiences expecting an Xrated throbber about the infamous sexual imperialist, or a yuk-filled bagatelle desperate to please, be forewarned: this is a serous comedy. Molière combines melodrama with commedia dell'arte lazzi. The acting follows suit: dramatic (but not sappy) deliveries, played front, join with comedic bits. The result's a sweeping theatrical style: ornate, expressive, stopwatch precise, and often hilarious. Adam Stein's Don Juan has as many layers as his intricately embellished costume. He amazes, in part, because you can be for Don Juan, then against him then split. Throughout Stein's rapier-like voice slashes at hypocrisy and injustice even as his character excels at both. Staged with a gilded proscenium and painted flats, the production offers riches both small - like the exact positioning of hands, even fingers — and large. Subtitled "the Statue at the Feast," *Don Juan* calls for a giant equestrian monument, which moves, and the crackling fires of hell. How do they do it? See for yourself Critic's pick.

Grassroots Greeks

6th @ Penn's former "Seven Weeks of Greeks" became so popular it's a regular series. And what a great idea! To reacquaint local audiences with the masterworks of ancient Greek drama, Linda Castro and David Cohen offer staged readings. The approach is refreshing. There's no attempt at polished work or choices set in granite. Instead, the actors treat the text as if this were the first day of rehearsal, the threshold of exploration. They read in a semicircle. There's some movement, a suggestion of costumes, and (re)acting, but the emphasis is on the word and, as in all Greek drama, on an unfolding story at once hair-on-fire irrational and as logical as a courtroom debate. It doesn't take long to see how pertinent and compelling these plays are. An informal discussion follows the reading, and admission is free — though 6th @ Penn greatly appreciates donations. Also: since space is limited, the theater recommends reservations in advance. Next reading: Orestes and The Cyclops, by Euripides, June 7. Worth a try.

I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change

One of the longest-running shows in Off-Broadway history, Perfect covers the zodiac of relationships, starting with a first date ("Will I be a date from hell?"), through the singles scene ("Single Man Drought"), to marriage, children, even a funeral. Along the way a San Quentin con scares a timid couple







into taking the Big Step ("You gotta compromise a little, you dickheads!"), and Rose Ritz tells the truth for her dating service videotape. Theatre in Old Town's engaging production features a four-person cast. They have the smarts not to push for comedy or drama, letting the audience choose its reaction (romantics can sigh, scoffers can, well, scoff). Andrea Chamberlain, Mylinda Hull, David Engle, and especially Stan Chandler, who must be one of the most versatile performers around, enhance every scene with strong

voices and precise character details. Credit as well to the costume designer, unnamed in the program, who provided everything from tuxes to Chargers T-shirts - and enough Velcro to permit what must be, in many instances, splitsecond changes.

Worth a try.

Late-Night Catechism

The Laguna Playhouse stages the popular "interactive adult catechism class," taught by a sister from the spare-not-the-rod school. The concept doesn't sound like much. The sister is substituting (it's the regular teacher's poker night, don't tell a soul). She used to teach but was deemed too strict for contemporary students. And the class is just that, part of a course on Catholic doctrine. But the sister's authoritarianism takes it to unforeseen places (you can hear cries of recognition from the audience, especially when sister brings out a hard ruler and taps her palm). The results, the two times I've seen the show: a. an almost nonstop evening of comedy; and b. a thought-provoking look at education, religion, and much more. The sister, it turns out, is not kidding. (Note: the Laguna Playhouse has extended the show's run six times.) Worth a try.

David Mamet's behind-the-scenes look at the craft (and catastrophes) of acting follows Robert and John, a seasoned pro and a young upand-comer. At first they're teacher/eager student, chatting in the dressing room. By the end, tricks learned, toughened by experience, John dons the mantle. Along the way, using scenelets and blackouts, Mamet chronicles just about every imaginable actor's nightmare from upstaging to windows, and a zipper, that won't shut. Though one could wish the North Coast Rep's show were better paced, and that the scenes where things go wrong weren't staged so much for laughs (which tends to sabotage the characters into mere buffoons), savvy veteran Jonathan McMurtry (Robert) and relative San Diego newcomer Francis Gercke (John) do quality work, especially with their evolving relationship. Jeanne Reith's excellent costumes not only trace John's rise in status, they also constitute a brief history of theater, from the Renaissance, through Chekhov, to today. Marty Burnett's set turns the stage around, putting the footlights in the rear. We are literally backstage, watching the magic of theater demystified, at times satirized, but also honored. Worth a try.

Remember the name: Stephen Adly Guirgis, a playwright with a better ear, and more street smarts, than David Mamet. Only two performances remain of his funny, feisty, four-letter-worded look at the lives touched by Sister Rose, a "living saint" (and alcoholic) who died, and whose body was stolen (or did an angel open the tomb?). The funeral reunites a melange of former students, everyone from a gay lawyer in deep denial, to a lapsed priest, to Rooftop, a talkshow host who's been there, done that, even has the T-shirt. Revelations ensue, including the clear sense that, even though touched by "saint," lives go on, often in spite of the intervention. And hearts still get "killed." Though one could wish the ears, and experience, of some of the actors were up to the play's demands, Korbett Kompany Productions merits praise for staging such a tough-minded, funny script. The production's uneven but performances by Tanya Johnson and John Nutten, and a special effort by Walter Murray, carry the evening. Murray's terrific as Rooftop, a complex of bluster, savvy, and rage, who says at confession, "Forgive me Father, for I have sinned...a lot...know what I'm savin'?'

Worth a try.

Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but San Diego Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" - five directors invented scenes, using the other four

as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, has written one of the few brilliant books (Improv) I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remem ber, when it's not funny, it's art.' Worth a try.



Jewel was on the Ballroom Casino stage for about an hour and played only five songs. Halfway through the show, she began to talk about Zoloft and Paxil for about ten minutes.

According to the newspaper, she stopped singing in the middle of her hit "Who Will Save Your Soul?" because people were singing along and said, "I would have never guessed you all know the words.

Stopping in the middle of a song is nothing new for her though. On her DVD Live at

Humphrey's on the Bay, which was released March 23, she was performing the song "Kiss the Flame" when she stopped, saying she forgot the words, and then had an audience member come up and whisper them into her ear while she

sang. Radio station 107.1 WERZ sponsored the concert. **Ö**perations manager Michael O'Donnell was quoted in the Hampton Union as saying, "They were upset with some of the comments they heard her make. She said she saw a better audience at a barroom brawl and that all drinkers and smokers were sinners.'

Kristen MacKinnon, a manager at the casino, said it was Jewel's request that smoking not be allowed at the show. Alcohol was served but not in the main stage area because Jewel requested no waitresses in the main ballroom while she was

onstage. Jewel's encore? The Hampton Union wrote, "Instead of singing one of her hits, she yodeled for a minute and then left the stage. Several people drove by her tour bus and screamed obscenities," Dion said.

Calls to Jewel's management were not returned.

Warner Music Group chairman Lyor Cohen said the goal was to reduce the roster of the three labels "from 180 to below 100.'

P.O.D.'s Oklahoma City-based manager, Tim Cook, said his band would not be one of the 80 artists getting dropped. He said Payable On Death

has been certified gold. The Recording Industry

Association of America certifies a record to be "gold" once 500,000 units are shipped to retail outlets. Cook admitted, however, that the amount actually sold was under 500.000.

"It's just a hair under a half million," he said, without getting specific. But one band with a San

Diego member did get the boot from the Warner Music Group. Year of the Rabbit was dropped by Elektra. "It happened in the last few

weeks," said Cook, who also managed that band. Year of the Rabbit was formed by San Diego native Ken Andrews. He said Andrews, who has worked



P.O.D.'s longtime A&R rep at the label, John Rubeli, is still at Atlantic, while many other staffers have been fired. It has been reported that the Warner Music Group is in the midst of cutbacks that will save \$227 million.

"Nearly everyone at Elektra is gone," said Cook.

Other Warner Music Group artists with San Diego roots seem to be safe, including Jewel (on Atlantic) and Jason Mraz (on Elektra). But it has been reported that the Elektra imprint may be eliminated entirely, and the surviving artists would then be moved to Atlantic.

Velvet Revolver, that unholy marriage of Guns N' Roses and former locals Stone Temple Pilots, launched their first U.S. tour May 15. Composed of three Guns N' Roses alumni (guitarist Slash, bassist Duff McKagan, and drummer Matt Sorum), STP frontman Scott Weiland, and guitarist Dave Kushner (ex-Suicidal Tendencies), the band is living up to Axl Rose's

penchant for tardiness, hitting the stage almost a half hour late in Detroit on May 20. The band showed up almost 45 minutes late May 21 for a Canadian press conference, whereupon they chain-smoked and used so many obscenities that little was publishable outside of porno mags.

In Chicago, four days into the tour, Weiland wore a

ne tour, we near police uniform onstage, then climbed a balcony post and leaped onto the heads of audience members. During the acoustic ode to murder, "Used to Love Her," the audience chanted, "Fuck

Axl Rose," prompting Slash to chastise them with "Was that entirely necessary?"

One reviewer commented, "On a scale of things you're likely to see in Chicago this year, Slash serving as the calm voice of reason ranks with Sammy Sosa sneezing his back out."

At their Toronto gig, even though audiences had only heard two Velvet Revolver songs ("Slither," their first single, and "Set Me Free" from the *Hulk* soundtrack), Weiland reportedly mocked the crowd for only singing along with the Stone Temple Pilots and Guns N' Roses hits. The band was heavily booed during their odd-choice encore, a cover of "Negative Creep" by Nirvana, a band whose emergence possibly contributed to Guns N' Roses' demise, and even to rock's abandonment of endless guitar solos and glam-jam excess.

The closest Velvet Revolver gigs currently scheduled are in L.A. June 8 and 9 (both dates

sold out in two minutes, according to a press release), coinciding with the release of their debut CD *Contraband*. On May 9 bassist Duff McKagan was spotted in the audience at Soma watching Slipknot, prompting a rumor that Velvet Revolver may play a secret San Diego show on June 10 (currently a "day off " on their schedule), to be announced at the last possible moment.

According to *somasd.com*, the Yeah Yeahs plus guests are appearing on June 10 as part of the 91X X-Fest. A person who answered the phone at Soma said he didn't know anything about the show's lineup or about Velvet Revolver appearing and added, "We're not allowed to talk to the *Reader*."

Len Paul responded, "I never said to anyone who works here, 'Don't talk to the *Reader*.' If anyone wants to talk to me they can come and see me. I never miss a show."

Regarding Velvet Revolver's unannounced guest appearance: "I have not heard a peep about them showing up. I do know we have a date in July or August on hold to reserve a show with them." — Jay Allen Sanford

"I'm suing them for \$700."

Milton Symister says he is suing two DJs at hip-hop station More FM (98.9 FM) because a local company they co-own stiffed him.

Symister says he signed on as a member of the "street team" for King Size Multimedia. "It's owned by four guys [including] DJ Raggs [Ricky Amezcua] and DJ Seize [Cesar Gonzalez]." He said he started working with the company in 2002.

"There were about 30 of us. When we first started, they told us none of us were going to get paid. They had us go to places like E Street and Blue Tattoo and put up posters for Columbia Pictures and Def Jam Records."

He said he had no trouble working free at the beginning.

"We got in clubs for free. We got free CDs.... This went on for a few months, but people got tired of not getting paid.... Then in April of last year, they made us a deal. They sent us an e-mail and told us they would start paying us. They said they would pay us \$100 a month for each account."

Symister said that, between April and August of last year, he worked on three different accounts for King Size.

"This whole business is based on evidence. Record companies want evidence. I had to take

pictures to prove what I did." Svmister

provided proof of both the email from King Size Multimedia and his photos.


"I have literally

hundreds of MILTO photos.... Because of our work, they were getting money each month from the record companies. They always had some excuse for not paying us. They blamed it on the record company. So they basically...thought they could get away with it. They thought I was some kid from the ghetto. They thought someone from the inner city would never take them to court."

Amezcua responded, "We have no problem paying him for the completion of the work. But he never turned in the pictures to us."

When told that Symister has the photos and seems happy to show anyone who will look, Amezcua said, "It's too late now. We had to outsource somebody else. We would pay upon completion of the work, but it is too late now."

Symister works as an instructor for a private afterschool program for elementary school kids. He said he has a June 22 court date at the



"Wildman" Fischer. The Frank Zappa protégé has been retired from music for over a dozen years, but his offbeat songs still appear on compilations. Fischer was kept by the CMH (County Mental Health) for a period of time and has lived at various downtown hotels (the Palms and the Golden West) and shelters in San Diego and L.A. since the 1990s.

Among Fischer's fans and friends is Devo's Mark Mothersbaugh (with whom Fischer recorded "Fun With Your Body").

"He [Mothersbaugh] gave An Evening With [Wildman Fischer, his 1969 debut] to Danny Elfman sometime last year, and he loved my stuff! He wants to use 'Merry-Go-Round' in Willy Wonka, and I'll get royalties and everything! The great thing is I don't have to do anything; I don't have to record again; they're gonna use my voice, but I don't have to make a record or tour."

The last time Fischer appeared onstage was August 5, 1988, at the San Diego ComicCon, where Bill "*Lost in Space*" Mumy was his guitarist. Lately he performs for tips on street corners, which is what he was doing when Frank Zappa discovered him and put him in a recording studio with the Mothers of Invention, the GTOs, and Kim Fowley. The homeless singer would end up becoming a cult sensation, though years later he was in court suing Warner Brothers over royalties he claimed were owed for *An Evening With Wildman Fischer*. A small

settlement was won, but the Warner Bros. money (an unknown amount) went to Gail Zappa, Frank's wife and executor of the Zappa estate, because the *Evening with Wildman Fischer* album was actually a Bizarre Records release (Zappa's label). A documentary about "Wildman" Fischer is being shot around town by L.A. filmmaker Josh Rubin, which



will include footage filmed in San Diego in 1995 for a Rugburns video where Fischer narrated.

hey formed in 1997 when all three members were 17. Seven years later, a little older and wiser but not lacking the youthful drive that was their impetus, the Peppermints continue to be the saccharine rapture of San

Diego's underground music scene. This punk power trio never fails to inflame, amuse, and abuse its rabid and curious audiences.

Oh sure, they've made some foes on the path to infamy and they may even be banned from or refuse to play certain venues — but this is to be expected. No band could rightfully label themselves "punk" without pissing off a few people otherwise they'd just be boring, and the Peppermints do not deliver a dull day.

Do they render the goods when it comes to the tunes? The critical reception to their recorded works on Pet Set and Pandacide Records have been a mixed basket of ripe and sour apples. Their lyrics are raw, their notes basic, loud, and caustic — the voice of a generation caught in the middle of too many mixed notions and genres.





The members of Tortoise have probably spent the past eight years cringing whenever someone brought up the term "post-rock," but it was invented largely to describe them. Here was a group of former indie rockers who had moved on to subtle, experimental, allinstrumental music that - unlike alternative rock — was not likely to be co-opted by the mainstream. They had a lot of like-minded friends and associates in the Chicago music scene. A lot of rock critics thought this was the beginning of something new and exciting.

The problem was that a lot of what they called post-rock sounded like fake jazz. And, frankly, there's still real jazz to be found if

The success of American Idol is proof that we live in a post-rock age. If rock were still king, someone would have smashed a guitar over Simon Cowell's head by now - or, at least. puked on Paula Abdul. Just when Tortoise's breakthrough Millions Now Living Will Never Die was released in 1996, teen pop was taking over rock's place in youth culture.





"There are only three white blues guitarists. and Geoff Muldaur is at least two of them" — that's from British legend Richard Thompson, I'd argue that the other is John Hammond, who all but bludgeons the listener with his singing and playing. But Muldaur's not so obvious. When he sits down, somebody else begins to play. Close your eyes and you'd swear it was an African-American singing those sunburnt Delta rags, certainly not some upwardly mobile cat from Boston with roots in the Woodstock coffeehouse scene of the '60s and '70s.

Always a beautiful picker, there are indications that Muldaur has finally arrived as a performer. Known as a musician's musician, his fans include the likes of Bob Dylan, Bonnie

Raitt, and Lucinda Williams. Ry Cooder-ness abounds in Muldaur's love of roots obscurity, but it's the quavering voice, which the New York Times called "otherworldly," that's made him a favorite of National Public Radio's Weekend Edition and A Prairie Home Companion. For a good sampling

of what he can do, break out Muldaur's Secret Handshake and track the bittersweet "Got to Find Blind Lemon (Pt. 1)." Muldaur's takes have a spit and polish, having been oiled up by modern recording and his own sensi-

bilities. In the end, there's an optimism that wasn't available to the original singers of the blues. But then Muldaur has enjoyed a good career as a computer programmer and as a pick-and-choose producer. He does not take audiences to the blues museum with all the implied polemics. Rather, his music choices and performances come out of an eclectic

Philly Up


Joe Crescenzo and his brother vacationed here from Philadelphia in 1974. Hungry at lunchtime for a cheese steak or a hoagie, Joe discovered he couldn't find a single such sandwich in San Diego. If you have ever tasted an authentic hoagie, you can understand that a Philadelphian would consider this a panic situation. "I realized, if I brought this food out here and opened a sandwich shop, I could make a living at it," he says. "I decided to come back and do it once I finished college." In June 1979, he opened the Philadelphia Sandwich Co.

The cafe is celebrating its 25th anniversary, proof that Philadelphians have a culinary heritage that's not only worth recreating but worth sharing.

The Philadelphia Sandwich Co. may be 25, but it looks like a well-preserved 50. Notice the maple-veneer tables and chairs; it could be a coffee shop in any small town in Eisenhower America — except the premises are bedecked with Philadelphiana, from sports-team pennants to cityscape photos to a black and silver hooded Mummer's costume (from the New Year's Day parade that's the Philly equivalent of Mardi Gras). I recognized one of the celebrity-diner photos: Philadelphia-born actor Jack Klugman (*The Odd Couple* and *Quincy*).

You go to the counter, order from the menu board, and take a seat. A few minutes later, your food is delivered to your table. The heart of the menu centers on two regional specialties, both invented by Italian-Americans in working-class South Philly: the cheese-steak sandwich and the hoagie "Italian special" sandwich, available in six-inch or ten-inch lengths. You can get yard-long and sixfoot party sandwiches, but you have to order those in advance. There are nonregional deli sandwiches (meatballs, roast beef) and green entrée salads resembling antipasti, decorated with cheese and Italian deli meats, turkey breast or tuna. Native side dishes include dinner salads, "Philly fries," Wise (no relation) potato chips, and for dessert, packaged pastries made by the Tastykake company, Philly's answer to Hostess.

The Philly cheese steak sandwich was reputedly invented in South Philly in 1930 by a hot-dog vendor named Pat Olivieri, who had a stand at the base of the Italian Market. One lunchtime, Olivieri got bored eating his own wares, so he bought beef

rib eye trims from a nearby butcher, sliced 'em thin, and sizzled them on his hot-dog grill along with sweet onion slivers. He piled the mixture into an Italian roll, but just as he was about to take his first bite, a regular customer, a cabby, showed up. Catching a whiff of the aroma, the

cabby asked Pat to make him one, too. As soon as he tasted it, the customer told Pat, "Forget about those hot dogs, you should sell

these." The Philly steak sandwich was born — but not yet complete. At some point, customers began to demand more options, and around 1940, melted cheese was added. Over the years, more ingredients — peppers, mushrooms, tomatoes, and/or pizza sauce — became options. Now, a version is available with chicken breast. Olivieri's descendants run the restaurant that grew from the sandwich, but it's now one of many.

"In Philly, the cheese steak and hoagie shops are like the taco shops here — you get three of them on every corner," says Crescenzo. "When I was growing up, if you had some space in your basement or your garage, you could open a cheese steak stand. They weren't too careful about permits in those days. I worked at hoagie shops all through high school; it was how teenagers earned money there." The cheese steak is now threatening to become a national fast-food fad. I've noticed ads

> touting a "Philly cheese steak pizza" from one of the pizza chains, and I've tried a Jack in the Box version of the sandwich. It left me asking, "Where's the cheese?"

At the Philadelphia Sandwich Co., a steak sandwich or a hoagie begins with fresh-baked "Frenchette" bread from Little Italy's Solunto bakery. This Italian loaf, with a soft crust and a cushy interior, is the same style of Italian bread, says Crescenzo, as those from Philly's Amoroso Bakery.

The steak sandwich filling features thin slices of lean beef and sweet onions — your original hot-dog guy's "Philly steak." Crescenzo gets his meat shipped frozen from the Philadelphia Cheese Steak Company, the butcher that supplies the concessions at Philly's new Alhambra Sports & Entertainment Center. The cheese goes on top of the beef, and you have a choice of white or yel-



low American, Swiss, provolone, or Cheez Whiz. The one cheese that *never* has been used in official Philly cheese steak is Philadelphia cream cheese, a product with no connection to the city beyond its moniker. (The cheese was invented in Chester, New York. Since Philadelphia was considered the gourmet destination of America in 1880, its distributor borrowed some cachet by naming the product for the city.)

I chose the purest regional form of the sandwich: the Cheez Whiz variation favored by a plurality of Philadelphians. I think natives add ketchup to give it life. On the second go-round, I did better, opting for the "Everything Cheese Steak": tomatoes, canned mushrooms (which Joe favors because of their moisture), and bottled red Italian sweet peppers. I specified provolone for the cheese. The provolone outdid the Whiz on every mouthful and gave the mushrooms a buttery flavor, while the peppers lent a nip to the beef. If you are not a Philadelphian by birth, I advise

skipping the simpler versions to indulge in "Everything." As with any great sandwich, the combination of flavors exceeds the sum of its ingredients.

Then the hoagie. Contrary to myth, the Philadelphia hoagie sandwich isn't named for musician Hoagy Carmichael. The most credible explanation for the name is that during World War I, Italian immigrants working at the Hog Island shipyard brought these sandwiches from home in their lunch boxes. The "hoggie" evolved into the "hoagie." Other folkloric explanations involve an envious Irishman named Hogan and the hoggishness of downing the whole sandwich at one sitting.

Whatever its origin, the hoagie was declared the "Offi-

cial Sandwich of Philadelphia" in 1992. It is one Philadelphia treat that I have tasted before, and I never forgot it. The summer I was 16, a Philly hoagie stand opened in Greenwich Village, my hangout. I'd eaten plenty of New York hero sandwiches, but the hoagies, with more greenery and herbs, were a thrill. Better yet, a buck and a quarter, if memory serves, for a giant sandwich bought a whole day's worth of food for two teenagers. We'd eat our fill, rewrap the leftovers stash them in my hobo bag, and when we got hungry again, we'd pull them out and gnaw some more

Re-encountering the same flavors all these years later, I realize why a pair of adolescent appetites met their Nirvana in this sandwich. It's not the size: it's the intensity. All the Italian-American mixed-meat deli sandwiches by any name (hero, submarine, torpedo) have a lot in common, but the Philadelphia

hoagie is as distinctive as the New Orleans muffuletta. Instead of the latter's olive salad, the dominant flavors are pickled Italian peppers (your choice of hot or sweet, they're chopped up, crunchy seeds and all), olive oil, and dried oregano leaves in a quantity so ample, they form a green crust on the tomatoes and lettuce. As the day goes on, pepper-pickling brine mingles with olive oil. The longer it takes to eat this sandwich, the zestier it tastes.

At the Philadelphia Sandwich Co., the dressing starts with young olive oil; the provolone cheese, even cold, is soft and malleable. The meat assortment, which includes half a pound in the 10-incher, consists of "juicy ham," "hot ham" (spicy capicola), and enough Genoa salami for garlicky bite. Unlike other local heroes, in the Philly hoagie the ham goes on top, where it's the first flavor in each bite. I can't praise the combination enough.

There are two house-made side dishes here. The house salad mirrors the ingredients of the hoagie (lettuce, tomato, peppers, oregano) plus croutons. The "Philly Fries" are not a Philadelphian dish, just Joe's method of making them. He fries the spuds fast in hot liquid shortening, so they maintain a potato flavor, then adds the final fillip of garlic salt. I like them a lot. All the deli salads, however, whether potato, mac, or pasta, are Reiser's brand, those mayonnaise-ridden plasticcupped food substances. At one point, Joe tried to introduce house-made potato salad made from his sister's mustard-spiked recipe. Customers rebelled.

The eatery sells one-pound packages of Habbersett "Philadelphia Scrapple," a respected brand from Folcroft, Pennsylvania. (Scrapple is a sort of pâté, made from pork "scraps" and cornmeal, a favorite breakfast dish for those accustomed to it.) Joe

doesn't serve scrapple in the restaurant because it's a breakfast food. And "Philadelphia Scrapple" turns out not to be a Philadelphian foodstuff at all (Crescenzo just developed a taste for it, he says). The origin of scrapple is rural western Pennsylvania, closer to Pittsburgh. The "Pennsylvania Dutch" (a misinterpretation of the word deutsch) might have brought the recipe from Germany to use all the pig scraps at butchering time — the head, plus various organs and innards you don't want to hear about.

These parts are ground up or emulsified, mixed with cornmeal and other grains, and baked in a loaf (call it Pennsvlvania's porky answer to Scottish haggis). Once the loaf has chilled and solidified, it's cut into half-inchthick slices, fried (in bacon fat), and served with eggs and ketchup or solo with maple syrup. I bought a package to see what it tasted like. Prepared as directed, it was similar to an all-in-one hybrid of toast and country sausage, with black pepper the pronounced seasoning. To my surprise, I found it very palatable, especially with maple syrup. Many people assume scrapple is similar to Spam. It isn't.

The last course for Philadelphians is a Tastykake: packaged pastries based on yellow cake. The restaurant offers varieties chocolate-frosted cakes are sweet; those with butterscotch icing are less sugary — but whatever your preference, if you ate a whole sandwich, you'd want to take your Kake and eat it later.

Since his brother's death. Ioe spends four days once a month in Philly to see surviving family and renew his Philadelphia cuisine inspiration. For the week of June 15, the cafe's anniversary, he plans to bring back Philly soft pretzels, another regional treat, so he can give them away to his customers.

Fit for a Pharaoh

"We get students. That's who we're aiming at. We need to stay lighthearted and as cheap as possible."

n my way to State to meet Carla. She's at some meeting near the campus, about Saving the Big Cats. Except I'm here looking at a Big Camel, half a mile away. It's outside a bright orange house with a sign saying something about "Egyptian," "hookah lounge," and "food."

Hmm. Egyptian food...Carla won't be through for a while anyways. I pass a couple of women eating focaccia bread sandwiches on the deck facing the sidewalk. Stop for a while. Join them. It's that kind of a place. Linell and

Emily. Linell's chomping into "The Phoenix," a sandwich with a thick wad of turkey slices in it, along with provolone and pesto aioli and greens (\$6.25). Emily has the Luxor Lite, half of the Phoenix plus fruit, for \$4.25. They say they experiment in eateries every Thursday. Love trying all sorts of different cultures.

Except what they're eating doesn't exactly sound Egyptian. I head inside to see what the deal is. It's all faux-painted yellow, red, and blue with creamy "wood" Formica tables and a fireplace with a fan-blown red-paper "flame" flickering away. Golden tin camels and a sphinx sit on the mantelpiece above. A second room opens out on the left. "Cleopatra's Study." Oh so inviting. Mostly red walls, sofas, Egyptian-style sitting-room chairs, a little library, and a computer you can surf the Net on for \$2.00 for 15 minutes, \$5.00 for 35 minutes.



My Asp." "East Side Nile Rules!" "The \$25,000 Pyramid was (a) A game show hosted by Dick Clark (b) Nefertiti's Dream House." I ring the bell at the counter. "Just a minute!" calls a voice. While I'm waiting I notice a sign saying hookahs cost \$9.95 for one

graffiti around the walls: "Tut Was Here." "Kiss

 smoke using standard tobacco, \$11.95 with "premium tobacco."
 But there's a deal on the chalkboard.
 "Hookah Happy Hour," it says. "Tuesday to

Friday, 3–7, half-price hookahs." Linda comes out finally. Apologizes. She says

she's on her own right now. "Guess I'd like to have something Egyptian,"

I say. "Any ideas?" Linda hands me a menu, which looks, well, like a fairly standard sandwich and salad mix. The Ramses Club sandwich is grilled chicken breast,

bacon, cheddar, lettuce, onions, and tomato, \$6.25. The Ahi Tuna Burger is a half-pounder with the usual lettuce, tomato, onions (\$6.95). Salads like the Caesar (\$4.95) or the Blackened Salmon Caesar (including salmon rolled in Cajun seasoning, \$7.95) look pretty solidly Western too. Sure, some names are Egyptified: the Aswan Dam omelet ("A dam good omelet," says the menu), with three eggs, gyro meat, onions, tomatoes, feta, and potatoes, \$5.95, or Tut's Toast, French toast "fit for a pharaoh," with bacon or sausage and "a medley of berries" for \$4.95.

It's only when you get into the appetizers that local flavors start talking. The Mummies are stuffed grape leaves, with rice, spices, and herbs (\$2.95). *Foul* ("fool") *madamas* is fava beans seasoned "with our secret spices," \$3.95; *lebni*'s a dipping yogurt with *zatar*, a thyme, sumac, and sesame seed combo (\$3.95). Then I spot Pharaoh's Pheast, a combination plate of all the appetizers. I go for that, even though it's \$7.95.

So glad I did. Linda brings out a big long oval plate loaded with three kinds of hummus (plain, pesto, and, hey, that great Egyptian seasoning, chipotle), a pile of kalamata olives, stuffed grape leaf "mummies," a bowl of *lebni*, and *foul madamas*. I almost ask for a Turkish coffee, but it's \$3.00. Instead, I ask for a straight \$1.25 coffee. Gotta say I love the different hummuses, flavored with orange peel, combined with that zippy herby thyme edge to the *lebni* yogurt. Even the fava beans taste, well, interesting. Man, if only I had enough money to try the hookah.

The guy who started this comes in. Harry. He's a graduate in English literature and creative writing from SDSU. When he finished his degree he went traveling and got hooked on Egypt. "Actually my girlfriend and I were going to start up a place like this in Ireland," he says, "but we split up, I came back home, and after four years looking found this place."

Harry says he's really thinking "fusion" when it comes to food. The Egyptian idea is really to do with fun. "We get students. That's who we're aiming at. We need to stay lighthearted and as cheap as possible."

And the hookahs? "I brought one back from Egypt, but it was cheap compared to the ones we have here." He brings out a box of hookah tobacco. "This is Mouj Al Bahr from Saudi Arabia," he says.

It looks like opium. Dark, sticky, sweetsmelling. "It's pure tobacco with molasses and white grapefruit pulp," he says. "It has no tars, and half of 1 percent nicotine, and when you smoke it through the hookah waters, that gets even less. I'm not saying it's healthy, but you can't compare it with cigarettes and cigars."

Who knows, maybe I can bring Carla back and we could share a...naah. She's an ex-smoker. Wouldn't be fair. But, dessert? A baklava (\$2.00) or a white-chocolate macadamia nut cookie with a glass of milk for dipping (\$2.50)? If anything can get her away from Big Cats, it's cookie dipping.

Epic Life

"I had wines from California, Oregon, Washington, Ohio, New York — I even had a wine from Hawaii."

By the time the Trefethen family established its eponymous Napa Valley winery in 1968, the property was already venerable. It started as part of 1850s pioneer Joseph Osborne's 1100-acre Oak Knoll Ranch.

In 1886, it became the site of the Eschol winery, 11 years after brothers George and James Goodman had begun planting vineyards on the surrounding 200 acres. The facility became home to a bulk winery and was later leased by Beringer for nearly 30 years prior to the Trefethens' arrival.

Now, the Trefethens are part of Napa's old guard, pioneers in the region's Great Reawakening of the '60s and '70s. Says wine writer Robert Lawrence Balzer, recent recipient of the Wine Appreciation Guild's Wine Literary Award, "I was responsible for most of that. After I received that Wine Appreciation Guild award, Janet and John Trefethen sent me a magnum of their reserve Cabernet Sauvignon with a little note, saying, 'It's about time. You're the one who gave us all our first spotlights.'"

And as spotlights go, Balzer's was a bright one. For 32 years, starting in 1964, Balzer wrote a wine column for the *Los Angeles Times Magazine*. "In the 1960s and '70s," writes Tim Fish in *Wine Spectator*, "Balzer was arguably



Wineries went to him first with their efforts, and winning a Balzer tasting was something worth mentioning. By the time he took the *Times* job, Balzer had already been in the business

the most powerful wine writer in America."

for more than 25 years. Balzer is perhaps the first person I have ever met who went into the wine business because he needed the money. "I wanted to go into the theater or motion picture business," he explains. "After graduating from

Stanford, I went to the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts in London."

He was enticed stateside by the possibility of a job with Warner Brothers; his father, who owned "the number one food and wine emporium west of New York, Balzer's on Larchmont in Beverly Hills," had managed a connection through one of his customers. Balzer started out as a messenger boy, making \$17 a week. When he decided he wanted to get married to a fellow academy student, he asked his father, " 'How much would you pay me if I went to work for you?' Which was, of course, what he had wanted to hear all his life. He told me, and I gulped and said, 'If you will pay my way back to London, with a honeymoon in Paris and a new Cadillac upon our return, I will accept your offer.' " In 1936, at the age of 24, he took over Balzer's wine department. He began reading Andre Simon, who became his guide. A year later, he was writing about food and wine for the store newsletter and for the *Beverly Hills Citizen*.

As a buyer, he got to know all the early luminaries, including Inglenook's John Daniel and Beaulieu's Andre Tchelistcheff. Alfred Knopf, a Balzer's customer, suggested he write a book about California's best wines. Balzer did, but not before Knopf had resigned from his publishing house. "Whoever took it over wrote of the manuscript, 'I find this an egregious example of patriotism.' It was the first time I had ever heard the word 'egregious.' I had to look it up in the dictionary." But Ward Ritchie agreed to publish the book, and Balzer was on his way. "Then the editor of Town & Country asked me to do a story. It was called 'California Wines Come of Age,' and it brought California wines to a very sophisticated, upperclass, high-income-level clientele."

Around the same time, another Balzer's customer, screenwriter Stanley Roberts, called Balzer for advice. "Ronald Reagan was pursuing Piper Laurie in a film called Louisa, and they were hosted for dinner by Edmund Glenn, an elderly gourmet." Roberts wanted to know what Glenn could do to demonstrate his epicurean bent. Here's what Balzer came up with: "Glenn was making a salad at the dinner table, and in the middle there was a beautiful bowl of flowers. He took the cruet of olive oil, and as he poured it over the greens he said, 'Be a spendthrift with the oil.' Then he picked up the cruet of vinegar and said, 'Be a miser with the vinegar.' Then the salt: 'Be a wise man with the salt.' And then he said, 'Be a madcap to mix it,' and reached into the centerpiece and took out some marigold flower petals and scattered

the orange petals over the greens. It was a color picture, so it was beautiful."

During filming, Balzer mentioned to Reagan that his great-grandfather had catered Lincoln's inauguration in 1865. Reagan, who referred to Balzer as "the Andre Simon of California," remembered the story. "When he became President in '81, he asked me to do his inaugural. I created something called 'Taste of America.' When I was working at Balzer's, I was also wine and food editor at *Holiday* magazine, which became *Travel Holiday*." Drawing upon that experience, "I chose a number of restaurants and wineries from all over the country for an invitational affair at the newly redone Union Station in Washington, D.C. I

had wines from California, Oregon, Washington, Ohio, New York — I even had a wine from Hawaii. People loved it; you could walk in and stand in front of Schramsberg, where they were pouring California sparkling wine, and then move next door to a restaurant serving beautiful creamed chicken on crumpets or something. We did it in '81 and '85, and I did it for Bush in '91."

Now he works for K-Mozart out of Los Angeles, broadcasting a 90-second Word on Wine Monday through Friday. It's a good gig — he gets to talk about whatever gems he's just discovered, local restaurants and tastings, "the food and wine highlights of my experience. I find no trouble in getting enough material."

Calypso Cafe 576 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-632-8252. This "Calypso" has nothing to do with Caribbean music (or food), despite its tropical tiki-hut decor. The cuisine is French, ranging from old warhorses like onion soup and *coq au vin* to newfangled Gallo-Cal-Italian-Pacific Rim hyphenates such as ahi pissaladière (seared tuna pizza). The traditional dishes are generally the most successful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. Although there's nothing revolutionary coming from this kitchen, the cooking is generally agree-able. Dinner nightly, reservations advised. Upper moderate. - N.W. (9/01) I Trulli Trattoria 830 South Coast Highway 101 (between G and H streets), Encinitas, 760-943-6800. An enduring hit in Encinitas (where there's no shortage of Italian restaurants), I Trulli serves modern Italian food with fashionable new ingredients. The menu, subtitled "Nouvelle Italian Cuisine," resembles the somewhat ambitious, generically "north-ern Italian" bills of fare that you encounter all over Hillcrest and the Gaslamp. (It is, in fact, a sister restaurant to Hillcrest's Arriverderci.) The signifiers of seriousness are the pink pep-percorns, goat cheese, sun-dried tomatoes, and light cream sauces that coexist with the more traditional mozzarella-tomato sauce arrays. Best bets are the daily specials, which offer the great-est chance for fresh ingredients and creativity. Busy, cramped, painfully loud in-side. Street patio next to highway is also noisy. Reserve for dinner on weekends or expect an hour's wait. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *N.W. 

Maybe their best is the "Bronx Special," an assortment of pepperoni, sausage, onions, olives, mushrooms, pepper and garlic, said to fell New Yorkers quicker'n one of James's right uppercuts. Paul's Place 3671 Mission Avenue (at El Camino Real), Oceanside, 760-721-0124. This restaurant looks like a McDonald's or Wendy's (the building used to be a franchise) and the food comes fast, but it's no chain. The menu strikes a balance between American and Greek fare. The baked Greek half-chicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gyros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American three-egg breakfast specials with home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburger, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkeyburger. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

Teriyaki 101 250 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-632-8813. This surfer hangout has a secret: Behind a gate just south of the restaurant there's a sheltered outdoor dining patio decorated by a tropical mural of island life above and below the water. "Eat Healthy, Feel Good" is the motto on the menu, and teriyaki is the dish that dominates it. But this is Hawaiian teriyaki, with lighter, cleaner flavors than the Japanese version. The dark-meat "Maui chicken" skewer and the moist ono (pink snapper) kebab are especially succulent; you can also opt for pork, veggies, numerous combos, and charbroiled burgers (of beef, fowl, or veggies). Everything comes with rice (white or brown), pleasingly touched with teriyaki sauce. Open Tuesday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. — *N.W. (10/01)*

Tip Top Meats 6118 Paseo Del Norte, Carlsbad, 760-438-2620. This geraniumsplashed blue-and-white Bavarian chalet is more than a butcher's shop. It's a combination butcher-deli-diner. Enter through the bulging deli and listen for the shouts and clatter of serving ladies. Look for the "*Es ist Wunderbar!*" sign over the counter. Try German and American dishes like Big John's all-youcan-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage.



Owner Big John is a heavyweight Olympic boxer from the former East Germany with an MA in meat sciences. Generous portions abound. Weekends after 4 p.m., he roasts his famous prime rib dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Vigilucci's 505 South Coast Highway 101 (at D Street), Encinitas, 760-942-7332. In the Land of 10,000 Trattorias, this is one of the most popular — and for good reason. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savuy seasoning — that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations include Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Seafood and Steakhouse in Carlsbad. — N.W. (10/01)

The Village Grill 2833 State Street (at Carlsbad Village Drive), Carlsbad, 760-729-3601. This little café is famous for two things: its vintage Coca-Cola decorations and its delicious Tommyburgers, named after the guy who opened this place back in 1976. Tommy believed in fresh ingredients, says son Dale, now in charge, who orders only "extra lean" meat from the local butcher for his burgers. For breakfast, check out the eggs and sausage-patty special with fried-skin potatoes and hot-buttered toast. And ii you surf, bring your board — the beach is just across the tracks. Breakfast and lunch Monday through Saturday. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (10/01)*

NORTH INLAND

150 Grand Cafe 150 West Grand Avenue (between Broadway and Maple), Escondido, 760-738-6868. Chef Carlton Greenawalt cooks up a seasonal American-Mediterranean menu with a few touches of Asian-fusion, using local and organic produce wherever possible. Among the pick hits: a clever almondcrusted manchego cheese appetizer, a definitive trout amandine, and interesting desserts, including a lovely lemon tinged crieme brûlée. Reservations advisable on weekends. Childrens' and vegetarian meals available on request. Street parking may be difficult; leave time to hunt. Dining rooms often noisy. Live music (mainly jazz) most Thursdays through Saturdays after dinner hours in Back Room Lounge. Moderate prix fixe dinners weeknights; slightly expensive à la carte on weekends. — *N.W. (10/03)*

Bolsa Vietnamese Restaurant 9225 Mira Mesa Boulevard #118, 858-693-3663. "The name 'Bolsa' isn't Vietnamese," says Kim Trang. "It's Spanish for 'bag.'" She's playing on words here: Trang once owned *Pho Bolsa* on University Avenue, and every Vietnamese knows *pho bo* is Vietnam's most popular quick meal, a beef rice noodle soup. At this location, Trang still makes excellent *pho bo*, but she has 122 other items as well, including fried catfish with ginger fish sauce, healthy (nonfried) Vietnamese spring rolls, or egg rolls with lettuce and mint in which to wrap them (sprinkled with *nuce mam*, Vietnamese fish sauce). We're talking family-style cooking. Come once and Trang will remember you and everything you ate — even if it was just *pho bo*. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (2/03)

Golden Egg Omelet House 316 West Mission Avenue (at Escondido Boulevard), Escondido, 760-489-6420. This breakfast-lunch treasure-house is vast but cute, its brick walls and open beams festooned with knickknacks (all for sale). This is *the* place on Sunday mornings, when three generations bond over great, generous breakfasts. Omelets are perfect — light, thin crêpe-like eggs wrapped around tall mounds of elaborate fillings. Thick waffles can be topped with fresh seasonal fruit. And then there are eggs, hash, crêpes, humongous burgers, and sandwiches. The potato casseroles, with a choice of a dozen fillings, are as huge in flavor as they are in size. Whatever you choose will carry you through until dinner. No reservations, so expect a wait on weekends. In back of a mall. Easiest entry from Mission is at SDGE driveway; do not pass McDonald's. Good handicap access, sturdy high-chairs, low-salt cooking. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. – N.W. (9/03)

Madras Cafe 9484 Black Mountain Road, Mira Mesa, 858-695-6229. In the same strip mall as Ashoka the Great, this family-friendly café features the savory vegetarian cuisine of South India. It's distinctly different from the standard North Indian menus, centering on numerous varieties of stuffed pancakes from thin, crisp (and irresistible) crépelike *dosais* stuffed with vegetable curry to lacy rice-flour *aapams* drenched in coconut milk to hefty, frittata-like *uttapams*. (Try the latter with the delicious, not-too-spicy chile-onion stuffing.) Puffy *poori* bread and tamarind rice are spectacular. Order your dishes in the sequence you hope to eat them — that's usually how they come out of the kitchen. And don't expect hovering



"Raj"- style service — it's just not the Tamil way. Seasoning is generally mild, to accommodate kiddies; spicy sauces are on the table. No alcohol. Open Tuesday through Sunday with buffet lunches and à la carte dinners. Inexpensive. — *N.W. (1/03)*

Meiki Japanese Restaurant And Sushi Bar 9823 Carroll Canyon Road, Eucalyptus Square, Scripps Ranch, 858-566-0206. You'll find a first-rate sushi bar tucked away in this tiny shopping center. The fresh yellowtail, scallops in spicy sauce (*hotategai*), or the special order of baked salmon roll are all wonderful. Fifty-three items appear on the sushi list, all prepared by a master chef. The cooked combination plates are also fine. If you sit at the sushi bar, you may be disappointed because chairs, not stools, are used and you can't watch the chef. If you're in the area, don't miss this one. Open daily, continuous service, lunch and dinner; Sunday, dinner only. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

Onami Japanese Restaurant 240 East Via Rancho Parkway, North County Faire, Escondido, 760-738-7522. 160-foot Japanese esafood buffet, hot Japanese dishes, salads, desserts, all you can eat. Tons of fresh food. Seats 250. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Expensive. — *E.W.*

GOLD COAST

Epazote Southwest Restaurant 1555 Camino Del Mar, Del Mar Plaza, Del Mar, 858-259-9966. Patrons frequently call this establishment the New York Stock Exchange because of its high energy, young crowd, and exciting atmosphere. Good dishes include southwestern-style tapas and spitroasted items. Sunday brunch à la carte. This place is always crowded. Open daily. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W*.

Nobu Japanese Restaurant 315 South Coast Highway 101, Solana Beach, 858-755-7787. The menu at this gourmet Japanese restaurant offers 100 sushi items, 20 stunning and unique appetizers, and a long list of entrées. Two dining rooms are available; the livelier is at the sushi bar. Especially on the weekends, arrive early to avoid waiting for a table. Reservations advised for dining room, not accepted for sushi bar. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — E.W.

Tony's Jacal 621 Valley Avenue (between Genevieve Street and Juanita Street), Eden Gardens, Solana Beach, 858-755-2274. Come here at night, when the mysterious low mud-brick arches with the stained glass windows make you think Old Mexico, when the Del Mar racing bar makes you think 1930s Hollywood, and the dining patio, under the 100-year-old chinaberry tree, looks straight out of Guadalajara. Back in 1946, Tony Gonzales's wife Catalina started preparing food for fellow Mexican workers. Since then, everybody from Liz Taylor to J. Edgar Hoover has passed through these portals. Try the "La Colonia" combination of just about anything with rice and beans. Turkey meat is big here, and the (real) crab quesadilla in a corn tortilla is delicious too. Cheapest: probably chicken strips with French fries. And "Jacal"? It means "shack." Open seven days, but with a gap between lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (10/02)*

LA JOLLA

The Cheese Shop 2165 Avenida de la Playa, La Jolla, 858-459-3921. Used to be the Cheese Shop had 100 varieties of cheese from all over. No more. "The cheese trade is dead," says owner Phil Schutz. They still have all-cheese sandwiches with mixes of provolone, Monterey Jack, Cheddar, Swiss, Muenster, Danish Havarti, or Norwegian Jarlsberg. But today this small, busy café is more famous for its "overstuffed" meat sandwiches. The leg of lamb, top round beef, and roast pork loin are all spit-roasted right beside you as you walk in, to waken your taste buds. Cheeses like crumbled Greek Mizithra add tang to the taste. If you're into salami and ham, try the footlong. Free peanuts while you wait. Inexpensive. Other location: 627 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-232-2303, open daily breakfast to late lunch, with delivery to downtown addresses. — *E.B. (10/01)*

French Pastry Shop 5550 La Jolla Boulevard (at Forward Street), La Jolla, 858-454-9094. A longstanding fixture of the Bird Rock area, this bakery/restaurant includes both a simple, spacious dining room and a shaded patio (reputedly San Diego's first dining patio). Breakfast — a highlight of the menu — is served until 4 p.m. The whisper-thin crèpes with luscious stuffings speak in a Gallic accent. Other possibilities include omelets, eggs Benedict variations, and fine-quality brioches and croissants. Pastries are moist, fairly light, and very sweet. Dinner entrées focus on updated French classics, e.g., duck breast a' l'orange, with "early bird" bargains. Open daily for breakfast through early dinner. — *N.W. (5/02)*

George's At The Cove 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-4244. The always-excellent George's, with its first-rate fish and meat menu, boasts three dining levels on its ocean-view site. The first level is the fine dining room, with full menu and gourmet lunch and dinners. Above is the Café, and on top is the Terrace, which is romantic on balmy nights. The Café and Terrace offer identical menus: light meals for lunch, extensive menu for dinner. The Ocean View Room offers high-quality California regional cuisine, with higher prices. Food is well prepared and their famous roasted chicken, bean, and broccoli soup is still on the menu. Incomparable service. Call for exact hours. Expensive, George's gourmet room; moderate to expensive, other rooms. — *E.W. (9/99)*

Harry's Coffee Shop 7545 Girard Avenue (at Pearl), La Jolla, 858-454-7381. When Harry Rudolph II opened Harry's back in 1960, his idea was simple: to create a down-home eatery and soda fountain where all La Jolla — rich, poor, Brahmins, and gardeners) — could mix and meet with plenty of good eats. Everyone from Joan Kroc to Junior Seau to Brooke Shields has been spotted here, along with regular folks who've been coming in for three decades. Now Harry III reigns quietly among a dozen whirling dervish waitresses at lunch, while his dad still works the breakfast shift. The big hamsteak and eggs is a favorite breakfast, as is the simple, rich "Hot Creamy Oatmeal" with strawberries. Pecan pancakes and thin, crisp waffles ring true to many Easterners (though Harry offers thick Belgianstyle waffles, too), and for lunch, turkey burgers and the bacon-loaded British Burger are popular. At the counter, the banter between been-here-forever waitresses and customers sounds like family life. Nice sidewalk patio, too. Long lines on weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B. (2/03)

India Palace 7514 Girard Avenue (at Pearl, across parking lot from Vons), Suite 10, La Jolla, 858-551-5133. Also, 694 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 691-294-8886. In one of the best (and prettiest) Indian restaurants in the area, the refined cuisine of the north is served in a curvacious, serene room with a domed ceiling. Most dishes are gently spicy, but you can specify your preferred hotness. Stunningly tender tandoori sea bass (and a rich, slightly sweet stew made from it, fish *masala*) is a house specialty. Vegetable entrées are also outstanding, particularly the sprightly navrattan ko*rma*, mixed veggies in a luscious nutty, creamy yogurt sauce. Other fine choices include tandoori lamb dishes, stir-fried prawns *karahi*, lamb *pasanda*, and eleven house-made Indian breads. Fried appetizers, however, tend to be greasy, and chicken in all preparations is overcooked drv breast meat. For dessert, don't miss the fresh, fruity house-made mango *kulfi* (Indian ice milk). Service is competent and cordial. Reserve for weekends. Open daily. Bargain-price buffet lunch (à la carte also available). Dinners inexpensive to low moderate, with a price-leap for tandoori meats. — N.W. (6/01)

The Pannikin Cafe 7467 Girard Avenue (at Pearl), La Jolla, 858-454-5453. Oh sure, the inside of this converted bungalow is cool, with its woody-green tables of different heights and cool damsels with animal temp-tattoos on their arms serving you. But here at Pannikin's La Jolla outpost, the outside's the "in" spot, with its brick and earth tones and weathered timber and sixties rainbow tables. But you have to make it through the laptop-clacking, cell phoneblabbing crowd who use this as their garden office and Very Important Meeting spot. Musicians, grad students, and school kids also show up to munch twigs and nuts and think serious thoughts. Breakfasts are mostly steamed-egg variations, including the popular Greek eggs and a filling breakfast burrito. For lunch, a mild chicken curry is a nutty treat, and "pannwiches" such as ham or tuna are fresh, generous, and worthy, though the retros among us will be looking for a salt lick all the way home. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (2/3)

Sushi On The Rock 7734 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-1138. This noisy, high-energy spot — a boxy, saloon-like space with a sushi bar in back — draws a lively twenty-something crowd (al-though older folks will have plenty of company, too). Unlike more traditional sushi bars, there's a vast selection of "rock and rolls" — huge, creative *futo-maki* party sushi. And they're fabulous, with sparkling fresh seafood and im-mensely clever combinations. Try, for instance, the shrimp tempura roll, which wraps fried shrimp, crab shreds, *daikon* sprouts and Japanese mayo in deep-fried salmon skin - the combo would be just as impressive as an appetizer at a top Cal-French restaurant. The Orange Crush is another sublime invention, fresh and crunchy with veggies and *tobiko* wrapped in suave salmon. Even simple rolls are so well-conceived, and the rice so nicely seasoned, you won't need soy-wasabi dip. The one-time menu of cooked dinner entrées, however, is now minimal. No reservations, long waits (in cramped entryway) on weekends. Full bar, good sake list. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly, with deep discounts for Happy Hour specials. Moderate. —*N.W. (6/01)*

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Adam's Steak N' Eggs 1201 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-291-1103. Morning munchers take heart! Adam's has served nothing but breakfasts since 1966. The menu runs from healthy — hot oatmeal with raisins, dates, sunflower seeds, almonds, pineapple and coconut — to corn fritters to a Southern brunch of spicy sausage patties, biscuits, gravy, grits, and eggs, to spiced apple crepes with whipped cream and pecans. But the signature dish is steak and eggs. The steak's a high-walled chunk of meat almost as thick as it is round. Comes with two eggs, potatoes or grits, and toast or tortillas. You won't need lunch. This bricky, dark wood, clubby, businessconvention-tourist kind of place has ver-ry faithful customers. But if you want to walk there, be ready for lack of sidewalks, one-way bus access, and wild morning traffic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

Aladdin's Cafe 5420 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-573-0000; Uptown Shopping Center, 1220 Cleveland Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-574-1111. These cafés offer a bright, clean atmosphere for bright and clean, if rather generic, Middle Eastern favorites (hummus, tabbouleh, kebabs, *shawerma*, etc.), plus imaginative Levantine-flavored pizzas and salads. There are ample choices for vegetarians. The Hillcrest location offers beer and wine. Inexpensive to moderate. — *N.W. (11/00)*

Dumpling Inn 4619 Convoy Street #F, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-9638. Hole-in-the-wall? Yes. But what a hole-inthe-wall. For those who love the Far East and its food, finding the Dumpli Inn is a little revelation. It's located in the busy Jasmine/Korean Market Center among Oriental herbalists, mansize-vase shops, even feng shui experts. The Inn itself is tiny but charming. Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold firecrackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd conical straw hat. The food is serious but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried three-ingredient *lo mein* (thick noo-dles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are challenging and exciting, as is the Dumpling Dinner (including hot-andsour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork, bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jellyfish salad - crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Lunch and early dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. Like the bacon, egg, and cheese sandwich, or two sausages, three eggs and Tater Tots, or the interesting chicken curry burritos. Even Chinese dishes: BBQ-duck rice bowl or stir-fried beef rice. But the joy is eating alongside clerks, judges, and the guys they'll be judging. 7 a.m. to 7:30 a.m., Monday through Friday. - E.B. (1/04)

New Shanghai 4681 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-569-4833. New Shanghai is busy, friendly, and draws a mostly Chinese clientele because their Chinese food isn't "Americanized." Whatever your gastronomic politics, try the generous plateful of dry braised shrimp, the "de-fatted pork shoulder," the hot tripe, and the ingenious red bean pancake dessert. Inexpensive to moderate. — M.N. (4/99)

Rosie and Joe's Grill & Cantina 7986 Armour Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-277-5777. Joe Polizzi and his wife Rosalie started this place in 1959. Now his son Paul and wife Lynn run it as a New Mexico-style eatery-sports barpatio café with karaoke and mini-golf. Popular dishes include the "Beerubin" sandwich (corn beef on rye with sauerkraut, Gouda cheese), the Sweet Sicilian sandwich (grilled Italian sausage, sautéed onions, bell peppers, provolone), and the California Chili Burger (with roasted chilis, onions, Gouda cheese). Also good: the Pescado Vera Cruz (pan-grilled fish with caramelized onions). Yes, it's out in the industrial wilds of Kearny Mesa, but it has a *Cheers* feel to it. Open for lunch, dinner, seven days. Inexpensive; dinners moderate. — E.B. (1/04)

THE BEACHES

Chateau Orleans 926 Turquoise Street (at Mission Boulevard), Pacific Beach, 858-488-6744. Just like eating in the French Quarter — at one of Bourbon Street's best tourist traps, complete with live music and party atmosphere. The lovely multiroom premises have a real Crescent City "let the bon temps rouler" feel to it, but the simpler Southern dishes — honest crabcakes, fried catfish — seem better bets than the kitchen's attempts at more demanding Acadian fare. Reservations strongly advised. A little dressy on weekends. Full bar. Wheelchair users may need help with rest room doors. Dinner Monday through Saturday. High moderate. — *N.W. (2/02)*

China Inn 877 Hornblend Street (between Garnet and Grand), Pacific Beach, 858-483-6680. The enormous menu here offers Mandarin and Szechuan specialties including especially good sweetand-pungent shrimp, Mandarin pork rib, duck in orange sauce, and shrimp in garlic sauce. The setting is simple but the food is outstanding. If chef-owner Andy Kam is present, ask his advice about the day's best dishes. Open daily, continuous service, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

Fairouz Cafe And Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious allyou-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at low cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. -E.W.

Karinya Thai & Vegetarian Cuisine 825 Garnet Avenue (SeaCoast Square), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie *The Beach*, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes getting off on the coconut curries like gang ped, panang, and kang kari. Or noodle dishes like the famous pad thai. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai origins. The tom yum kung (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table, the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course *nam pla*, Thai fish sauce. A nice counterpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: *pad talay*, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in *The Beach*. At all locations of this delightful mini-chain, you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings buroning with plant life and craft objects. geoning with plant me and cran coject. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lob ster or calamari steak - in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an an-ground. And sample something with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, try — anything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No reservations, but call ahead for large parties. Inexpensive. - N.W. (6/01)

Rum Jungle Smoothies and Deli 4150 Mission Boulevard #153, Promenade Mall, Pacific Beach, 858-273-2227. Why do Brazilians have more fun? *Açaí* (ah-saa-ee). Why do Brazilians settle in PB? Maybe it's because Rum Jungle Smoothies serves up *açaí*, the flesh of a Brazilian palm nut, for breakfast. The dark purple mush comes from the açaí palms that grow around the Amazon River delta. Rum Jungle adds granola, banana, strawberries, blueberries, mango pieces, and honey to make a surprisingly filling breakfast. Of course this bright lit tle place has lots of other smoothies, too, along with garden burgers and sand-wiches. But the *açaí* power fruit bowl is what keeps them coming back. Open 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/04)

Eat outside on deck, contemplating the small ships on the bay. They buy seasonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their attached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fishermen. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Mondays. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Big Kitchen 3003 Grape Street (be-0th Street and Fern Street), South Park, 619-234-5789. This isn't just a restaurant, it's the social center of the universe — and Judy "The Beauty" Forman is its queen. Blame her for the Fern Street Circus, for driving the Miss Cali fornia beauty pageant out of town, and for disgustingly healthy dishes like Judy's Favorite (spinach, mushrooms, sherry, and eggs). Our favorite: the avocado, cream cheese, and chives omelet. Vegans' fave may be the "veggie option": sautéed spinach, mushrooms, onions, cilantro, brown rice, tofu, and roasted garlic. Her cooks make pretty much everything on the spot, including muffins, waffles, and pancakes. While you're waiting, they alwavs have this "out there" eclectic crowd. plus walls filled with pictures and bon mots like "Will Be President For Food." Breakfast and lunch only; closes at 2 p.m. most days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/02) El Comal 2822 Imperial Avenue, Sherman Heights, 619-239-7101. No border compromises here - just great homecooking from Michoacan, Guerrero, Jalisco, and Oaxaca, prepared by Luz Herrera Ibarra, a biology teacher from Acapulco. Try the huarache (cactus slices with carne asada, frijoles, cheese, and onions) or the mulita carne adobada (pork, melted cheese, and guacamole in-side two tortillas) and have a glass of *nuez* (a refreshing walnut drink). Breakfast through early dinner daily. Inexpensive. - E.B. (11/00)

Jyoti-Bihanga 3351 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-282-4116. Oh sure, you'll be watching Sri Chinmoy, the Bengali guru, on TV juggling, declaring Geneva International Airport a "Peace Blossom," or boarding his Italian *"Treno della Pace.*" Plus, his books, his portraits, his paintings, and his chant-songs surround you. Apart from that, not only is this heavenly blue-domed restaurant run by his students peaceful, but the fresherthan-fresh Bengali-tinged health food is delicious. Their chuney-topped "Neatloaf" bursts with nutty, intriguing flavors. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes different. Also delish: Brahma Burrito, "Infinite Blue" (interesting brown rice salad with bleu cheese dressing), and the Shiva Wrap (tofu and fresh veggies with a well-integrated curry flavor). On cold days, start with a steaming sweet pea soup. Monday through Saturday lunch and dinner, Sunday brunch only. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (10/01)*

Mama's Bakery And Lebanese Del 4237 Alabama Street, North Park, 619-688-0717. This informal little restaurant is more interested in quality than presentation, concentrating on the specialties they do well. Mama's offers quick meals with a culinary tradition, definitely not "fast food," but with fast food prices and ease. Recommendations include the deliciously cheap falafel sandwich in Mama's fresh-made *sajj*, (soft flatbread). On cool days warm up to a bowl of *fool mudamas*, or slowcooked beans (tasty fava and garbanzos). Try also spinach pie, *labneh* (creamy cheese, olive oil, and pita), and *baba ghanoush* (smoky pureed eggplant and hummus). Inexpensive. — *M.N.* (1/99)

EAST COUNTY & STATE COLLEGE

Antonio's Hacienda 700 North Johnson Avenue, El Cajon, 619-442-9827. If the décor hasn't been updated from its original 1960s-fabulous Old California Spanish, it's because there's been no need. The enormous dark-wood chandeliers, the paddedleather wooden chairs, the chainsawweathered wood beams — all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, reveling in the guitar trio and the exposed kitchen station — such atmospherel And the flavors are user-friendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. The Camarones Tequila is a little more exciting; the sweetness of its bacon-wrapped shrimp gets a fine counter from the bitter liquor in the marinade. Excellent Enchiladas Suizas: pale, mush-tender shredded chicken wrapped in tortillas and doused with good, tangy green sauce. Lunch and dinner daily. Champagne brunch on Sundays, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; all-day buffet Suu day through Thursday. Inexpensive to low moderate. — A.M. (4/03)

Cafe Zia 6686 El Cajon Boulevard (at Montezuma), College Area, 619-337-3937. South Asia meets Mexico! Khaled Zia had the brilliant idea of combining tacos (or wraps or bagels) with chicken and South Asia's great gift to the world: chutney — mango chutney, papaya chutney, peach, apple, even a serrano chili pepper chutney. The combo works with them all. As soon as you smell the chicken strips hissing away on the grills, you're hooked. Then when they come smothered in peach or mango chutney, or cooling yogurt, along with sweet-sauced potatoes, what can you do? Do as half of San Diego State does: just say yes. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

Downtown Cafe 182 East Main Street, El Cajon, 619-440-5687. Surprise! Not far from Magnolia and Maina French-style sidewalk café. The successful "Por Favor" eateries' owner launched this as a kind of Mexican patio restaurant, but serving gringo food. And it works, maybe because of reasonable prices for baby-back pork ribs, giant burritos, or Louisiana Chicken strips. Or even the veggie burger. But it's partly where you dine: out on the patio. The place has lots of ancient doors and wrought iron-and-wood window frames, laced with creepers. Inside is a beautiful long bar with a counter on the street and chess sets so you can play and watch the world go by. Lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (5/03)*

Jimmy's 9635 Mission Gorge Road (at Town Center Drive), Santee, 619-448-8994. We're at the end of the line here, the trolley's Orange Line. Feels like a safari. You walk back through the grass to the streets of Santee. Thank goodness for this family-friendly restaurant with good, old-fashioned American food. Their six-page plastic menu tells all — forget your diet and dig into the breakfast "Eggs and Cakes" (two eggs, three pancakes), the "Touchdown" (two

eggs, two hotcakes, four strips of bacon or three link sausages), or the "Monte Cristo" hot sandwich (ham and turkey grilled on batter-dipped Texas toast with Swiss cheese, hot syrup, and French fries). Later in the day, the New York strip or sirloin steak with all the trimmings, and desserts like homemade cinnamon bread pudding with raisins and whipped cream. Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Tyler's Taste Of Texas 576 North Second Street, El Cajon, 619-444-9295. Unfussy home cooking. Some dishes outshine others. The slab of smoky ham steak that comes with the first-rate breakfast is in itself enough to rouse the sleepiest appetite. Expertly sautéed onions and mushrooms lend flavor to fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebbly-smooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character. For lunch and dinner, the Texas menu features Texas-style barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and sausage) that's sufficiently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. BBO beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. Pleasant surprises: a substantial, peppery cornmeal crust on the ten-der catfish and the fried green tomatoes, and the rich stock in the vegetable soup Open 24 hours. Inexpensive to low moderate. — A.M. (2/02)

FAR EAST

Badlands Market/Cafe The Mall, 561 Palm Canyon Drive (south side of the street), Borrego Springs, 760-767-4058. This is an epicure's oasis in the desert, a combination of gourmet deli and serious café where you can find a lively breakfast, scrumptious picnic lunch, or (on weekends) a light, savory dinner from an imaginative, daily changing menu. Great cheeses, påtés, extra-virgin oils, artisan breads, delicate pastries and full-bodied French Roast coffee are among the delights that make this the Garden of Eatin' in a town where both grocery stores are pretty dire. Open Sunday to Thursday for breakfast to late lunch; Friday and Saturday until 7 p.m. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

Pablito's of the Desert 590 Palm Canyon Drive (in The Center, #8), Borrego Springs, 760-767-3311. Pablito's claims "Authentic Mexican Cuisine, patio dining, and great tequila margaritas." Well, the gorgeous patio is open only during busy times and the cuisine runs to gringo favorites in the Mexican mode (lots of combo platters), but the flavors are honest and pleasing. The most authentic dishes come from the "Specialties" section of the menu, including a good *chile verde* (pork in green chile sauce), numerous varieties of enchiladas, and several flavors of *chilaquiles*. Full bar, including sangria, margaritas, Mexican beers. Open daily, lunch and dinner (with break between). Inexpensive to low moderate. — *N.W. (4/03)*

Ramon's Smokehouse BBQ 1730 Alpine Boulevard, Suite 110, Alpine, 619-445-1008. The smell of mesquite wood burning under fresh-cut beef rib is beyond resistance. The secret Texas recipe draws crowds. Go Sunday morning, especially, when chefs in maroon aprons dance around the fat-spitting fire, disappearing into the clouds of fragrant smoke to flip the racks of beef and pork ribs. In good weather you can eat out back next to an authentic chuck wagon. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

Bertrand at Mister A's 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel), 12th floor, Banker's Hill, 619–239-1377. Bertrand Hug's airy, open renovation of this formerly "ancient regime" eatery offers a fabled panoramic city view with a casual-chic, highly romantic ambience. Chef Stephane Voitzwinkler's modern French cuisine is a fine fit for the setting, including bistro classics and fresh inventions, emphasizing top-grade seasonal ingredients. A huge, intelligent wine list covers a full range of prices, ages and origins, including "ripe" first-growth Bordeaux. Smoking and fair-weather dining on wraparound terrace/observation deck. Note: parking entrance on Fourth Avenue; wheelchair access via ramp to left of reception desk. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Expensive. — *N.W. (1/04)*

California Cuisine 1027 University Avenue (between 10th and Vermont), Hillcrest, 619-543-0790. This 20-yearold neighborhood favorite underwent an exciting total remake in February, 2003. The hard-edged, mirrored decor's the same, but a new chef, Justin Hoehn

La Jolla

(coming from Laurel), has replaced the lengthy grazing menu with fewer but better-honed choices that the small kitchen can execute without a hitch. And the guy has a flawless palate. Most appetizers are simple but devilishly clever, literally living up to their name, while entrées exhibit fresh, sophisticated combinations of exquisitely balanced, global flavors, with garnishes smartly chosen to complement the primary ingredient. But save room for a sweet: Dessert Chef Laurel Huffnagle produces the bold, thrilling endings that these meals deserve. The restaurant is very noisy when busy. Private garden-patio dining available in good weather. Well-chosen wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Friday; dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Upper moderate to expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

Celadon Royalty Thai Restaurant 540 University Avenue (near Sixth Ave-nue), Hillcrest, 619-297-8424. The chef has cooked for the Siamese royal family, but more importantly, she hasn't made too many compromises in the cuisine on this side of the Pacific. Some dishes taste luxurious, and all the dishes taste authentic - and very carefully prepared. The regular entrées offer a choice of sauces (red curry, green curry, etc.) with vour choice of protein, but go straight to the "Cher's Specialty" items on the menu to find the best and rarest dishes. Stuffed chicken wings are extraordinary, seafood soup talay is fabulous, and among the entrées, don't miss choo chee duck or the Queen of Thailand's favorite, Pineapple Fried Rice. — *N.W.* (5/02)

City Delicatessen 535 University Avenue (at Sixth), Hillcrest, 619-295-2747. Some folk come for the Jewish food (chicken-in-the-pot, brisket of beef, chopped liver), others to soak in the art-deco colors - the cornucopia of fruit above the entrance, the mustard yellow walls, the black-and-white checker tile, or the flower bunches of red. blue, green, and yellow lamps. And then some come for both: the stuffed cabbage roll (with ground beef and rice inside) is a glowering red ball with maroon, oniony, sweet-and-sour raisin sauce to die for, set off by green parsley and bright orange slices. Scandalously delicious. Downside? Our pastrami sandwich tasted dry and chewy by comparison. But City Deli is less strictly Jewish (they have bacon on their breakfast menu) and more of an everyday New York-style eatery. Wait staff are good-humored, and the Seeburg Wall-o-Matic tableside jukeboxes actually work. Bring plenty of quarters. Breakfast all day; early-bird dinner specials; late-night dining. Open from 7 a.m. till midnight; until 2 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (5/03)

Cottage Cafe & Garden Grill 2321 Fifth Avenue (at Juniper Street), Banker's Hill, 619-696-0071. The Polish feel of this midtown café is palpable. The owners vacation in Poland yearly to update the family recipes. But you can eat American if you want, with smidgeons of Russian, Italian, and Greek, too. The "Farmer's Breakfast" is a roundup of chopped ham or sausage, onions scrambled with two eggs, home fries, and toast. Or go Polish with a grilled Polish sausage sandwich stuffed with peppers, onions, and sauerkraut on tye. A full range of Polish specializes shows up on the weekend all-you-can-eat buffet, with stuffed cabbage, beef stroganoff, sausages and cabbage, and chicken paprika. Try the Polish beer, "Okocim, 1845," but be careful—it's 8.1 percent alcohol. Great patio out back. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — E.B.~(9/01)

Gulf Coast Grill 4130 Park Boulevard (between University and El Cajon), Hillcrest, 619-295-2244. The Gulf's faux-rustic, woodsy dining rooms and patio are great hangouts if you like a restaurant with a noisy party atmosphere. The menu focuses on the cuisine of the South and Southwest, with an emphasis on Louisiana and a heavy hand on the salt shaker. The kitchen does best with the straight Southern dishes, turning out divine fried soft-shelled crabs, airy hush puppies, and delicious little corn muffins. If you're deeply familiar with Cajun-Creole flavors, though, don't look for pure authenticity — you'll do better with jambalaya, étouffée, or the lunchtime oyster po' boy than with the soulless gumbo or the misconceived red beans and rice. Heated, smoker-friendly front patio. Wheelchair elevator to rest rooms next to stairs. Free parking lot left of the door. Full bar. Lunch Monday through Saturday, brunch Sunday, dinner nightly (early closing Sunday). Moderate to slightly expensive. — *N.W. (4/03)*

Ichiban 1449 University Avenue (at Normal), Hillcrest, 619-299-7203. Is this Paris or Tokyo? At night, the café outside glows like a Van Gogh painting, except the customers are eating sushi and drinking green tea, not red wine. The best values are at lunch, with weekday specials like Bento combos (sushi rolls, crab, salmon, rice) and filling soups overflowing with veggies and thick *udon*

This long-running, old-fashioned Italian favorite (formerly Giulio's in Pacific Beach) is a low-cost family restaurant with fresh, casual fare. The best bets are angel hair pasta, minestrone soup, and their famous scampi. Outdoor patio is a plus. Open daily, lunch and dinner; continuous service on weekends. Inexpensive to upper moderate. — E.W.

Kemo Sabe 3958 Fifth Avenue (off University Avenue), Hillcrest, University Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-220-6802. Audacity is Chef Deborah Scott's culinary signature. In her cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touches and towering heaps of garnishes. All the edible frou-frou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive chilpotle cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a *picante* marinade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the housestyle — sky-high, ornate, com-plex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Reservations strongly advised. Prices moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

La Posta de Acapulco's Taco Shop 3980 Third Avenue (at Wash-ington), Hillcrest, 619-295-8982. (Also in Lakeside and Spring Valley.) People have been coming to this orange-andwhite drive-through-without-cars for 20 years. One of the main reasons is the carne asada burritos. Rich-tasting, fresh, generous. Folks sit around the outside benches right next to Washington Street, oblivious to the traffic. Also much loved here are the *chile verde* and the quesadilla with *carne asada*. For breakfast, think chorizo burrito. And for value, just to fill you up, you can't beat the bean tostada. You can drink horchata, a rice drink, or *jamaica*, made from hibiscus flower, to complete the picture. Open 24 hours. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/04)

Lotus Thai 3761 Sixth Avenue (at Robinson), Hillcrest, 619-299-8272. Ironically, the best dishes at this id-iosyncratic, vegetarian-friendly Thai-Chinese restaurant involve char-grilled beef (e.g., *satay*, beef salad) featuring a tender cut in a tangy marinade. From the long list of house specialties try the lively pineapple-cashew fried rice, the chile-fierce "Crazy Duck" salad, or the savory (if slightly dry) "three-flavor" whole fried fish accompanied by a garlic-chile-fruit jam. Appetizers, though, are mainly greasy-fried wraps, and too many dishes are oddly bland (even when they're spicy). The flesh components (shrimps, chicken, etc.) all taste like they've been parboiled in plain water and tossed into the pot at the last minute, with nothing left to give to or gain from the sauces — so if you crave soup or curry, you're best off with the elaborate vegetarian versions. Lunch and dinner daily. Low moderate. -N.W. (4/01)

Mission Hills Cafe 808 W. Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-296-8010. Belgian waffles are your natural intro here. Why? Because François, the owner, is Belgian. The man knows waffles. But the thing is how cheap this is for a sophisticated eatery, with its linen tablecloths, waiters in long aprons, and bread baskets. (The bread's a dime.) Dishes like Thai chicken or shrimp salad over shredded jicama. cucumber, and carrots are usually rich folks' territory. Ditto the "Pear Cambozola" salad, with strawberries, pecans, and a Camembert/Gorgonzola-style cheese, or "François's Famous Vegetar-ian Lasagna." And check out François's art on the wall — he always cooks one part in his oven, like the baked bread horses stuck on his piece called "Sea Biscuits." Daily, three meals. Inexpensive by day; more expensive at night, but reasonable. — *E.B.* (9/03)

DOWNTOWN

Bay Cafe 1050 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-595-1083. If you're hungry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsome bayview terrace (with no wheelchair access). After a chilly crossing, try the en-joyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced potatoes. The menu features breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches, variations on fish and chips including prawns, and chili dogs (all served with generic fries), plus some entrée salads. The burgers are genuinely "have it your way" - for a few extra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mushrooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). Open daily, 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Inexpensive. — *N.W. (8/01)* Chive 558 Fourth Avenue (near Island Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-4483. Eating's an adventure at this coolly minimalist urban bistro where chef A.J. Voytko does his magic with a seasonally changing menu of inventive "modern cuisine." Dishes alternate between high-risk global fusion and stringently simple combina-

tions that place outstanding ingredients (including free-range chicken and veal) at center stage, accompanied by a revelatory repertory of exotic vegetables. The worldwide wine list offers over 50 choices by the glass. Reserve for weekend dinners, when a chic young crowd pours in. Full bar. No cell phone use inside. Dinner nightly, with weekend service to 11:30 p.m. Expensive. — N.W. (9/02)

DeMedici 815 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-7228. This lovely, cream-andsepia dining room evokes an Italian Renaissance villa, while its sidewalk patio offers a prime pageant of Gaslamp follies. Either way, you'll enjoy exceptional service — attentive but utterly unobtrusive - and a menu centered on succulent pastas and refined seafood dishes. The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering; Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress on the spiffier side — some Holly-wood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, upping the clothing curve. Dinner 5 p.m.to 10:30 p.m. weekdays, 5 p.m. to midnight weekends. Moderate-priced valet parking available. Moderate (simpler pastas) to very expensive. -N.W. (8/01)

Dublin Square 554 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-239-5818. The entire pub was hand-crafted in Waterford, shipped over, and installed (by Irish craftsmen) in the Gaslamp. The exterior indeed resembles a real (but very new) Dublin pub; the interior has authentically dim lighting and spirited Irish music including live bands (acoustic but loud) dur-ing Happy Hours and some evenings. If you're looking for food, too, there's a shockingly fine corned beef and cabbage, resembling the corned beef of Katz's Deli on the Lower East Side — it's that wee touch o' the garlic that does the trick. Other choices include Guinness beef stew, shepherd's pie (made with ground beef), chicken pot pie, steaks, lamb chops, fish and chips, and grilled fish, plus standard pub grub. Lunch and din-


Kansas City Barbecue 610 West Market Street (at Harbor Drive), down-town, 619-231-9680. Scrumptious smells waft across the tracks at the Seaport Village trolley stop — barbecued pork and beef. And yeah, this is the joint where Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis did their sleazy bar scene" in Top Gun. And it is kinda sleazy, especially in the shadowy horseshoe bar, with memorabilia like hanging bras, Czech license plates, and stickers ("Grow Your Own Dope: Plant A Man"). The beef and pork ribs (or rib tips or chicken breast) are worth it. They're cooked over an oak-fueled fire. Nice long Happy Hour (3:30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., at bar only) has great food/grub deals. Open daily, lunch until late, serving until 1 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (3/01)

The Latin Room 560 Fourth Avenue (at Market), Gaslamp, 619-237-7800. This austere, concrete-floored space is mainly a tequila bar, offering at least 120 brands to sample and tasty Mexican cocktails made from scratch. But you can also get a reasonably interesting Mexican meal from a menu that's considerably more ambitious than the neighbor hood's regular border-Mex yawns. It offers excellent tortilla soup, decent ce-viche, and filet mignon strewn with cuitlacoche (a.k.a. "corn mushrooms," a mild and juicy black fungal delicacy), with recipes imported here by a chef who used to cook at Tijuana's revered Cien Años restaurant. A couple can easily make a meal of a few shared appetizers. At 10 p.m. weekends, the place goes disco, with cover charge (IDs checked). Open nightly for dinner, appetizer menu until 2 a.m. on weekends. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (1/04)

Morton's Of Chicago 285 J Street (between Second and Third), Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxurious, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their Ne-braska beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-a-half or three-pound porterhouse, which will be juicy, marbled with flavorful fat. You can also get good fish at Morton's. The big, golden salmon fillet flakes to the fork and is moist, sweet, buttery. The pricey à la carte sides are either bad or mediocre. The Godiva Hot Chocolate Cake is exceptional. But go for the steak. Expensive. — *M.N. (9/99)*

Nagi's Bar and Grill 501 West Broadway, downtown, 619-233-5933. Nagi Sekla comes from Egypt, via Paris. Before he took over the lease at the staid Koll Center's bar-eatery, he insisted on cre-ating a sidewalk patio slap-dab on Broadway. His lease is our gain. For the first time you can eat, drink, and be merry right on this main drag. And there's nothing like scarfing lunch while you watch lawyers, tourists, and office workers hustle by in the morning sun. Lunch or dinner, start off with his home-made soups, but the must-eat is his Spicy Santa Fe Chicken Salad — the magic's in the cranberries and Gorgonzola. Also great: BBQ chicken pizza. Lunch and dinner, Monday through Friday. Inex-pensive. — *E.B.* (5/03)

Rainwater's on Kettner 1202 Ket tner Boulevard (at B Street), Little Italy, 619-233-5757. You *could* order the fish, the chicken, or even the lamb, but odds are you're here because you want steak, prepared by people who respect your enthusiasm and offer prime beef in multiple cuts. And you're here because Rainwater's is venerable and local. You can





This recipe is vegetarian; it's healthy and exemplifies what we do at Indigo, in that we deal with a lot of root vegetables. It has a rustic appearance to it. There is very little cream. It has a very clean and simple flavor.

Most people can make this one at home without too much difficulty. I like to give something to people that is user-friendly. It's not critical whether you use light or dark brown sugar. Personally, I like the dark brown sugar. It gives it more of a dark orange


Garam masala is an Indian spice mix that can be found at the grocery store and comes ready-touse in the powder form. This won't achieve quite the same flavor as if you make it starting with the fresh spices. Every time you take shortcuts, there are compromises in flavor, but the garam masala is a usable alternative that will achieve a good taste.

We buy all our spices whole, dry roast them, grind them, and then incorporate them into the soup. I'm including our



Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-to-gringos ra-tio. It's hard to imagine a better start to the day, in any sweeter ambiance, than at La Fonda ("The Inn"), which offers Mexican and American breakfast dishes and a lavish Sunday brunch buffet with both. Arrive early for patio seating under a straw umbrella with a full-out ocean view. The bilingual menu is written on chalkboards and dinner choices change nightly, featuring American and Mexican seafood entrées and deluxe meats aged in-house. Most staffers speak some English. Full bar, including Baja-grown wines. Open daily, three meals, starting about 9 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate; cash only. -N.W. (4/03)

Malecon de Puerto Nuevo North west edge of Puerto Nuevo; take Calle Entrada (entry road) to the ocean-front bluff, edge right, and walk about 30 feet down a steep dirt road running seaward from the street-market on the oceanside edge of town. Look for a yellow building with blue trim and a terrace with umbrellas. Worth looking for. This great, honest little restaurant harks back to the original, uncommercialized "lobster village" before it got its capital letters and written menus. Open since August, 2002, it's owned by an active fisherman, who serves (as much as weather permits) fresh caught local lobsters and genuine "daily catch" with standard sides — superb fri-joles, red rice, real melted butter — and that's all. The first-course ceviche, when available, is astonishingly flavorful with fish caught that very morning; in harsher weather, a hearty, warming fish chowder substitutes. Breaking from Puerto Nuevo tradition, when the lobster is fresh caught it's simply split and grilled, not lard-fried first, and all the better for it. Some staffers are bilingual. Open brunch through dinner. No reservations, cash only. Low moderate. — N.W. (11/02)

It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions, Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. At night, the Nobel Drive branch features a view of the shining Mormon cathedral. Cinema of Sadness

A lot can be told without telling a story.

hameful though it is to say, the opening of Millennium Mambo at Madstone's Hazard Center on Friday marks the first local theatrical booking of any film by the Taiwanese director, Hou Hsiao-hsien.

Our confetti must be mixed with ashes. Although for obvious reasons not a household name in these

parts, Hou is perhaps the most remarkable filmmaker to emerge on the world stage in the past quarter of a century. (The "perhaps" makes al-lowance for the Coen brothers — we'll see how that shakes out - or for the late emergence of Clint Eastwood into full maturity, or for some filmmaker as yet unknown.) Several of Hou's films, even so, have had showings in local festivals and series: City of Sadness and Flowers of Shanghai in the San Diego International Film Festival and San Diego Asian Film Festival, respectively, and Dust in the Wind and Goodbye South, Goodbye in separate programs at the Museum of Contemporary Art. Millennium Mambo itself was shown two years ago in the firstnamed festival, but I happened to be out of town at the time, a perfect il-

display. Let the revelation begin. Before we get to the film's title, before we get to one of Hou's patented group portraits in flux around a table, we are introduced to the heroine in a dreamy slow-motion single take, with the camera tagging along behind her, transfixed by her bouncing hair, unable ever to catch up, as she strides beneath the fluorescent tubes of an endless pedestrian overpass, occasionally looking over her shoulder at the breathlessly trailing camera. A third-person narrator tells us the essential situation: a long-term abusive relationship with a no-account boyfriend named Hao-hao. The heroine would periodically break it off, and




then, "as if under a spell, or hypnotized," she would keep coming back for more. (The narrator will tell us this again later on, word for word, as if on the same, or a similar, treadmill.) We will also be told that all of this happened ten years ago, although the period of the film is explicitly the turn-of-the-millennium. Our present day has already become the past. (The film itself, furthermore, is already three years old.) Whatever will happen has already happened. We will never catch up to the bouncing hair. The heroine must remain forever out of reach.

Once we've been told the essential situation, we've been told everything we need to know. The film has a situation only; it has no story. The events, if you can call them that, are recounted

in no particular order. Their repetitive nature — the numberless break-ups and make-ups - renders chronology irrelevant. Now and again the narrator will fill us in on what happened right before we see it happen. (Faint echoes of Robert Bresson.) A flashback, for instance, to a police search of the boyfriend's apartment for a stolen Rolex will be broken off before

the reported discovery of the incriminating pawn ticket: conventional suspense plays no part. In place of narrative incident, the film traffics heavily in texture and tone, extending, to be sure, below the surface to emotional texture and moral tone. Nothing much could be said to go on, if life itself were thought to be nothing much: the heroine takes a job as a strip-club hostess, where she meets an easygoing gangster named Jack, an alternative to her volatile on-again-off-again boyfriend. Jack is more of a gentleman than Haohao, but Jack has troubles of his own. We never do learn the fates of these characters, despite the ten-years-later point of view. A lot can be told, however, without telling a story. And this is a rich, rich film.

The first and foremost of these riches (as always) would be the imagery. Working again with his regular cinematographer Mark Lee Ping-Bin, Hou imposes complete command of the visual elements: color, composition, rhythm. A colorist of a high order, he garnishes the sallow flesh tones of his people, and the central dreariness of their milieu, with liberal dabs of gaudy, artificial color: Pop color, neon color, rhinestone color, often out of focus in the background or foreground to create Impressionistic smears of color. The palette sometimes suggests a grayish plate of sliced turkey and giblet gravy brightened around the edges by a small spoonful each of canned cranberries, sweet potatoes, corn. He has an Ozu-like eye (or Mondrian-like eye) for structuring an image, while at the same time freeing up the people as compositional elements and permitting them looser movement and sloppier posture. Favoring long takes, preferring to let a scene run its course without cuts — a nice thick slice of time — he gets full value out of a shot, never discards it too soon, never undertakes it in the first place unless it is worth pursuing. For one example among countless: the boyfriend's systematic smelling of his girlfriend — yes, smelling, of her hair, her neck, her shoulders, between her legs - on her return to the apartment late at night, and the girlfriend indifferently putting up with it as long as it doesn't interfere with her smoking and drinking. (The accompanying techno beat - muffled as if coming up through the floor rather than laid on top of the image at a smothering volume — is characteristic, too, of Hou's matchmaking skills in marrying image to sound.) The contrast between the richness of the imagery and the barrenness of the lives on view is certainly striking. And all this richness of imagery - this vivid-is inevitably quite beautifying. But it is beautifying without ever glamorizing. Or better say, more simply, it is, in the deepest meaning of the word, cinematizing. (The absence of drama and suspense will guard against glamorizing as well.) A Hou film never shirks the single most vital task of a film: to make us see.

The remainder of the film's richness is philosophical. (Its task here again, in a larger sense, is likewise *to make us see.*) Through the lusciousness of its color, the grip of its compositions, the tenacity of its tempo, it lets us appreciate, even while the characters may not, the preciousness of life. And this, in combination with the flatline narrative, fosters a sort of nostalgia for the present, a longing to do it all over again, an awareness of its slipping away. (No take-charge tips will be put forth on Breaking-the-Cycle: this is

not a dose of prescription medicine for the Lifetime channel.) The most haunting moment in the film, which might easily have seemed mawkish were it not so authentically poetic, comes in the scene of a winter holiday in Japan, with our strip-club hostess cavorting in the snow like a six-yearold. The precise moment: she presses her face into a snowbank to make a mask-like impression of her features, a startling restatement of the old footprint-in-the-sand image of mortality. If the principal characters, one and all, are unexceptional, unadmirable, unsympathetic - if they are, as a Somerset Maugham might say, "scum" if they are deemed "worthless" - it does not diminish the preciousness of life; it paradoxically heightens it. Snow White and Cinderella had no need of second chances.

Let me see if I can pull the strands together. Or rather, let me see if Hou can. The action, remember, is set at the turn of the millennium, a temporal milestone that invites us to look both backwards and forwards: the end of something and the beginning of something. But the "futuristic" narration, delivered from a decade away, severs the present day from its moorings and pushes it prematurely into the past. And the entire repetitive sequence of events — nonlinear, unsuspenseful, anti-dramatic — feeds into a distinctly Eastern, river-of-life idea whereby each and every place at which you dip into the stream, although vividly, intensely, insistently *present*, also contains the past and the future. It is all connected, all one. Awareness is sadness, and vice versa, and no one has made sadder movies than Hou.

But maybe I make too much of it. By all means see for yourself. *Millennium Mambo*, at the very least, gives you a lot to look at and a lot to contemplate. One of the tangential things it gives you to contemplate is the number of films today that give you absolutely nothing.

The Alamo — Creditable retelling of an early chapter in Texas history ("As goes the Alamo, so goes Texas"), not as cumbersome as the John Wayne version of 1960, perhaps even a little cursory. Director and coscreenwriter John Lee Hancock humanizes the central figures — Crockett, Bowie, Travis, Houston, though not the ogre-ish Santa Anna — without demythicizing them, and without diminishing their heroism. Stage actor Patrick Wilson, with his Paul Newman puckered lips and baby-blue eyes, makes an impressive screen debut as Travis, under better control than the veterans Billy Bob Thornton (Crockett), Jason Patric (Bowie), and Dennis Quaid (Houston). 2004

Baadasssss! — Mario Van Peebles writes, directs, and stars in a re-enactment of his father Melvin's struggles in the film industry. (LA JOLLA VILLAGE; MISSION VALLEY 20; FROM 6/4)

Carandiru — Fact-based Brazilian prison film starring Luiz Carlos Vasconcelos and directed by Hector Babenco. (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

Coffee and Cigarettes — A collection of eleven comic sketches filmed over a period of almost two decades by Jim Jarmusch, all of them involving, if not actually revolving around, coffee and cigarettes (or in one case, tea and cigarettes) and the various restaurant tables on which these are arrayed. Each takes place in a new location with new characters, although certain ideas and actual lines of dialogue will recur. Each, too, observes strict formalities in its manner of presentation: black-andwhite photography; the camera permitted only one direction of approach, as through a proscenium arch (one exception: the outward-looking angle on a sparking science-fictional gizmo); and every table, at least once, viewed from directly overhead (praise be to Godard!). Many in the motley cast - Roberto Benigni, Steven Wright, Iggy Pop, Tom Waits, Cate Blanchett, Alfred Molina, Steve Coogan, Bill Murray, two members of the Wu-Tang Clan, former Warholian Taylor Mead, et al. — play themselves, but not the Southern-accented Steve Buscemi, and Blanchett plays not only herself but also, in a brunette wig, her lookalike lower-class cousin. The last-mentioned skit is a virtuoso acting display, and it vies with the Molina-Coogan duet as the best of the bunch. All of them, however, have their little drolleries - very little and very few, yet just enough to fend off boredom. 2004. ★ (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

Dawn of the Dead — Shorter, straighterfaced, altogether squarer remake of the George Romero zombie bash. The "commentary" on American consumerism, or anyway the locality of a Middle American shopping mall, remains as pertinent today as in 1979, if scarcely as fresh. And the cannibalism now seems to pertain not so much to the society at large as to a depleted film industry overly dependent on bloodsucking remakes. The same could have been






said, in fact did get said, of the 1990 remake of Romero's Night of the Living Dead. Little has changed in that respect. In another respect, the escalation of video-game violence on screen (whether or not this can be connected to things like Columbine off screen) makes the mowing-down of the zombies seem so far from fresh as to be downright rancid. The most boring revision of the material is no doubt the juicing-up of the walking dead — the wobbling, staggering, stumbling dead, in Romero's version - with a new, athletic speed and strength. A more constructive new idea was to locate the gun shop across the street from the mall instead of inside it: the first step in the eventual migration toward a nearby island sanctuary. Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind — Charlie Kaufman, scriptwriter of Being John Malkovich, Adaptation, and Confessions of a Dangerous Mind, drills a new tunnel into his favorite fictional locale, the human brain, this time by way of the science-fictional device of an illicit memoryerasure service called Lacuna, Inc. ("Technically speaking, the procedure is brain damage, but it's on a par with a night of heavy drinking.") Both halves of a failed romance avail themselves of the service, first the female half, and then (in distress over his former lover's failure to recognize him) the male, who belatedly changes his mind and begins to struggle against the erasure in midstream. The old theme of cold-scienceversus-warm-humanity emerges. And inasmuch as the protagonist is asleep for the operation, the flow of fragmentary memories, riddled with surrealistic dislocations and juxtapositions, takes on aspects of cognitive dreaming as well as psychoanalytic free association. The French

origins of director Michel Gondry, who earlier collaborated with Kaufman on Human Nature, prompt us to draw a connection to Alain Resnais quicker than we otherwise might. The latter's explorations of the mind in general and memory in specific are, fittingly enough, far more cerebral (Hiroshima Mon Amour, Last Year at Marienbad, Providence), though he himself was not above making use of a sciencefictional device: the haywire time machine in Je T'Aime, Je T'Aime, pinballing its human guinea pig through the lowlights of an unhappy love affair. (The theme of coldscience-versus-warm-humanity emerged there, too.) Gondry, a music-video and TVadvertising veteran, with a common weakness for the wacky and the tacky, has none of the refinement of Resnais, but that's no reason to condemn him out of hand. A popularized, a vulgarized version is preferable to none at all; it might even inspire the odd viewer or two to follow the trail back to the fountainhead. Kill Bill, Vol. 2 — The second half offers no convincing evidence that Quentin Tarantino needed two installments to tell his scrambled tale. It convinces us instead that









in its entirety the film is even worse than initially believed. For much of the time, it looks more like sweepings from the cuttingroom floor than like a legitimate sequel: a dumping ground for the slow parts. Certainly, any part that features David Carradine — the titular Bill, who finally puts in an appearance, tootling his own musical motif like Charles Bronson in Once upon a Time in the West - will necessarily be a slow part, inasmuch as the actor enunciates his lines like a drunk driver in a roadside conversation with a Highway Patrolman. The sole sensation of speed, the sole release from the Leone-like longueurs, could come from getting caught up in trying to keep pace with the cinematic in-jokes and allusions. But the only profit in that line of pursuit — a trivial pursuit par excellence would be the verification of Tarantino's credentials as a movie nut. The Ladykillers — The Coen brothers' first-ever "unoriginal" work: a remake of a mid-Fifties British caper comedy by the underappreciated Alexander Mackendrick. In mitigation, the brothers throughout their careers have been so partial to the pastiche - the neo-noir Blood Simple, the imitation-Hammett Miller's Crossing, the imitation-Cain The Man Who Wasn't There, the alternately Capra-esque and Hawksian screwball comedies, The Hudsucker Proxy and Intolerable Cruelty — that an actual remake constitutes only a subtle difference in degree. Then, too, their shared interests with the Ealing Studios original — an interest in the unravelling criminal scheme and an interest in human stupidity renders the Coens' appropriation of the material into an act of tribute rather than of plunder. With The Big Lebowski and Fargo in particular, they have earned their rights to The Ladykillers. Finally, they have effected so many changes - in milieu, in plot, in character, and in language — as to reclaim a measure of originality. They have much fun, as has Tom Hanks, with the high-flown diction (periodically brought low by the selfconscious adolescent snigger) of the criminal mastermind who styles himself an Old Southern gentleman and scholar: "portal," "redoubtable," "ignoble," "derring-do," "cogitation," "contretemps," etc., etc., not to mention his impromptu





The Passion of the Christ — A work of devotion, and a big gamble, for Mel Gibson, financed out of his own pocket, boasting no big-name stars (Jim Caviezel and Monica Bellucci, the biggest), not to mention English subtitles for ancient languages, graphic gore, and a firestorm of pre-release publicity on its latent anti-Semitism. A version of this story that would bear down on the bodily punishment absorbed during Christ's last day on Earth was probably, in the fullness of time, inevitable. And it's a short step from saying that such a version was inevitable to saying that it's a particularly appropriate one for its time: a Passion, if you will, for the new millennium More specifically, bereft of the spiritual and



obsessed with the physical. In the end, there's really very little to it, apart from duration: the arrest in Gethsemane (with such excessive force as to leave Jesus at the outset looking like Rocky Balboa after a fifteen-rounder); the kangaroo court; the

interminable public torture (Mel's martyrdom in Braveheart was but an

appetizer); the marathon uphill climb to Calvary; the spikes in the hands and feet and the spear in the side; and scarcely more than ten seconds for the rolling-away of the stone and the restoration of the body for the ascent to Paradise. A major contributor to the aforesaid duration — two hours plus is the willy-nilly use of slow-motion, always a handy access to dramatic emphasis for a filmmaker too lazy or inept to achieve it by honest means such as pacing and camera placement. And please don't bother to voice any misgivings over the suitability of so voguish a device in so classical a setting: that just goes along with the ultra-violence to identify the film as of its time. 2004. • (VOGUE, FROM 6/4)



As in Big (the official point of reference), this proves to be less of a handicap than you might expect. The callowest mind has the best idea for the magazine's makeover ("I want to see my best friend's big sister!"), and the path to Enlightenment, as any adolescent devoutly believes, can be circumvented by shortcut. The movie, blithely directed by Gary (Tadpole) Winick, has a hard time grasping, or keeping a grasp of, its own concept. The spectator's tolerance of it will probably depend on his tolerance of the bony allure of Jennifer Garner — a death's-head with dimples, and not the most credible spokesperson for the Natural Woman. Troy — Big (two hours, forty minutes) oldfashioned (not to say ancient) sword-andsandal epic, complete with the traditional Cast of Thousands (however many of them may nowadays be computer-generated) and the mandatory Wooden Horse, plausible in its physical appearance if implausible in its placement at the foot of a downsloping sandy beach several miles from the city walls (why bother to lug it inside?). In basic outline a fairly straightforward illustration of events in *The Iliad*, or at any rate events on the human plane, it is all apt to seem terribly familiar to anyone who made a habit of actually reading his assigned reading in high school, regardless how long ago. Which is not to say it is all apt to seem terribly interesting. The casting of the movie, to begin with, can be said to be a little off when Achilles and Briseis (Brad Pitt and Rose Byrne) look prettier than Paris and Helen (Orlando Bloom and Diane Kruger, a Teutonic Ursula Andress type). Nor is it good storytelling to balance the legendary love that brought down an empire, and even to overbalance it, with a rival love whose only purpose is to flatter the movie's star.



And not even his preludial one-on-one duel against a bald, multi-scarred, mountainous Goliath, and his zigzagging jump-and-stab maneuver in slow-motion, can convince us of Pitt's claim as the Greatest Living Warrior. A larger problem, though, seems to have to do with the aforementioned familiarity: the plainness, the bareness, the rudimentariness of the basic myth. Myth demands a bit of dressing-up if it wants to continue to turn heads in the modern world. (See what the Coen brothers did with The Odyssev in O Brother, Where Art Thou?) And it's not enough simply to instill the characters with a self-conscious, an unbecoming, an almost obnoxious certainty

as to their own immortality and their place

in history: "This war will never be forgotten, nor will the heroes who fight in it." They're right about that, but it's not for them to say. With Eric Bana, Brian Cox, Peter O'Toole, Sean Bean; directed by Wolfgang Petersen. 2004.

The calm, measured, sure-footed style of veteran director Yoji Yamada (forty-odd films, alone, about the "lovable tramp" known as Tora-san) has a dignity of its own. Lest that be misconstrued as a compliment, let's be clear that what he does for them amounts to a steroidal disfigurement, an abomination against nature — or, as you like, against art. (Sommers appears to have borrowed from The League of Extraordinary Gentlemen, not just the Dream Team idea, but the particular misconception that Mr. Hyde is bigger than Dr. Jekyll, when the reverse should be the case.) It takes some doing, to give credit where due, to conceal completely the talent and the beauty of Kate Beckinsale; even Underworld couldn't do it; but this busy, noisy, instantaneously tiresome movie succeeds spectacularly on both counts. LEAD STORY

— In May, California law firms asked a court to approve \$258 million in fees for their handling of a lawsuit against Microsoft Corp., amounting to \$3000 an hour for the lead attorney (who billed for 6000 hours of his own time, even though three dozen lawyers from more than 30 firms had a piece of the case) and \$1000 an hour for administrative work, all for the following consumer bonanza: Each victim will get a coupon worth \$5 to \$29 toward the purchase of another Microsoft product.

Finer Points of the Law

— In April, a judge in Ocala, Fla., sentenced a 27-year-old man to probation for having sex with his then-girlfriend's rottweiler (with the man admitting that he had a "lifelong problem") and lamented that under state law, the man could not be forced to register as a sex offender, since the victim was a dog. ... Also in April, authorities in Nashville, Tenn., charged Metro News with violating the state's Sunday-closing law for adult businesses, but the owner said he would fight it since he had recently tried to avoid the law by occupying most of his floor space with a Sunday-law-acceptable retail furniture and garden business (although his sign still said customers had to be age 18 or older to shop for furniture).

Government in Action

— Although 50 countries have now banned American beef because of inadequate mad-cow controls, the U.S. Department of Agriculture not only has declined to order widespread testing but has prohibited one farm, Creekstone (Campbellsburg, Ky.), from voluntarily testing. The USDA said such conscientious testing would imply that America's entire 35 million yearly slaughters should be tested (which the industry says is too expensive). The USDA said it aims to test 40,000 cows, up from 20,000 for the past two years (although it has been unable for nine months to document those tests in response to a Freedom of Information Act request by United Press International).

Can't Possibly Be True

— Until March, Mr. Dayn Riegel and his girlfriend kept 77 cats in their house in Lawrenceville, Ga., but a Humane Society spokesman said he saw no problem in that all appeared to be in good health and well-fed, and Riegel's home was clean (though filled with litter boxes). Riegel recorded each cat's history on a computer database, provided one packaged meal and one special meal a day for each, and turned over 60 pounds of cat litter a week. During a recent move from the home, Riegel gave away a few of the cats.

— Veteran schoolteacher Carrie Peoples, 63, quit her job in April in Covington, Ga., after an incident in which she responded to a trash-talking 14-year-old student by ordering two male classmates to toss the girl out of an open window (even though it was a first-floor window); the boys dutifully complied, for fear of punishment. ... Teacher Jason Schoenberger, 24, was suspended from PS 279 in Brooklyn, N.Y., in March after he hung a 5-year-old student on a closet coatrack (allegedly with the kid's permission) to see the shock on a colleague's face when he walked into the closet.

— Sweden's parliamentary ombudsmen's office in Stockholm, looking through some old environmental records recently, discovered that in 1986 an environmental court in Jämtland province had denied a resort-development permit to a builder because the "Storsjö monster" (serpentlike body, catlike head, first rumored in 1635) often "sighted" there had been declared endangered. Declared the ruling, "[I]t is prohibited to kill, hurt or catch animals of the Storsjö monster species" or to "take away or hurt the monster's eggs, roe or den."

— In April, the Virginia Supreme Court turned down the petition for a new trial for Aleck J. Carpitcher, who was sentenced in 1999 to 38 years in prison for molesting an 11-year-old girl. The girl recently told authorities she made up the incident to punish Carpitcher, who was at the time dating her mother. The justices cited state law, which allows consideration of "new evidence" only if it is submitted within three weeks of the sentencing date.

— The Boston Herald reported in April that the Massachusetts Treatment Center, at which the state's pedophiles and rapists are housed, was using a controversial aversion therapy that some experts say includes providing convict-patients with illegal child pornography and forcing them to masturbate repeatedly, past the threshold of pain, in the belief that child images will thus eventually become uninviting.

People with Issues

New Hampshire state representative John Kerns resigned in February while on the verge of expulsion for, among other things, writing "State of New Hampshire" on some personal checks (later dishonored) to feign officialness and for threatening violence after unsuccessfully demanding a private parking space. He appeared at one court hearing wearing a black cape to, as he said, improve his credibility as a defendant. ... Presidential candidate Robert Haines, 57, of New Hampshire, was arrested while campaigning in Virginia in April after he threatened to kill a police dog over a parking ticket dispute. Last ear, at a Dartmouth College football game, Haines tried to commandeer the public address system and ceremonially "throw out the first football" (which is only done in baseball).

— A man took \$180 from another in a home robbery in Covington, Ky., in April. The money was handed over by the victim only because he was late in noticing that the gun the man was holding had no barrel. As the robber ran out, the victim called police and neighbors joined in a search, but the only thing that was found nearby, according to the *Kentucky Post*, was discarded clothing and "pieces of a gun."

Recurring Themes

— A 2003 "News of the Weird" report heralded a rural Peruvian doctor for performing lifesaving surgery to relieve swelling in a man's skull using only a carpenter's drill and pliers. In a similar incident near Ketchum, Idaho, in December (with medevac helicopters grounded by a blizzard), Dr. Keith Sivertson likewise saved Ben King's life, but using a Makita power drill from a clinic's maintenance shop.

More Things to Worry About

— In April, Floridian Sheryl Hardy, who was sentenced to 30 years in prison for her role in the 1989 death of her two-year-old son, asked the Department of Family Services in Illinois (where she now lives after early release) to be allowed to raise her follow-up baby, who had been taken from her by the state after she gave birth in 2001. ... In Edinburgh, Scotland, bus drivers are apparently subjected to so much abuse that transit officials recently gave all 1800 operators DNAcollecting kits so that they can swab themselves when passengers spit on them.




