City Shells Out Millions to Mush Masters

suspected of having sticky fingers. Four law, accounting, and

investigative firms have wangled contracts aggregating more than \$15 million to probe the city's concealment of pension and health-care deficits. Two of those firms and the parent of a third are under investigation for their roles in financial capers through offshore tax and secrecy havens.

The accounting firm KPMG won't certify the 2003 city audit because it believes that the Houston law firm Vinson & Elkins did an inadequate job digging into the pension mess. City attorney Mike Aguirre and pension whistle-blower Diann Shipione agree that the two Vinson reports were whitewashes just what the city wanted. Thus far, KPMG has positioned itself for more than \$3 million in payments, and Vinson will get more than \$6 million.

For a year and a half, a federal grand jury in New York has been investigating offshorebased tax shelters sold by KPMG from 1996 to 2002. Those shelters cost the government \$1.4 billion in lost tax revenues, says the Internal Revenue Service. Last week, it appeared that KPMG might avoid a criminal indictment by settling with federal regulators for \$450 million.



fraud, conspiracy, and tax evasion for his role in promoting and preparing papers for the allegedly abusive KPMG shelters. KPMG has been reticent with the press, but it has issued statements saying it takes responsibility for actions of its former partners.

Vinson represented Enron, which concealed its losses and debt in complex offshore partnerships. In 2001 alone, Enron shelled out \$35.6 million to Vinson, almost 8 percent of the law firm's revenue. Enron was the firm's biggest client. According to a May 22, 2002, story in the Wall Street Journal, Vinson sometimes raised objections to Enron's offshore deals but "didn't blow the whistle. Again and again, its lawyers backed down." Vinson partners represented Enron in Cayman Islands-based off-balance-sheet transactions, according to the Journal. Enron management and the board "relied heavily on the perceived approval by Vinson & Elkins of the structure and disclosure of the transactions."

In civil suits, financial institutions have now agreed to pay a collective \$7 billion for their roles in the Enron debacle. But

We Can't Reach Everybody

tion notice by the Shelter Plus Care facility on Streamview Drive in East San Diego. "We've had seven men die in less than four years that I've been here. It's not that they die on the premises. Sometimes they relapse and return to the bushes, where they get their heads bashed in."

Shelter Plus Care, a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, was funded in San Diego by the department with a \$5 million grant in 2000. A welcome addition to the social services community, it is administered locally by the San Diego Housing Commission and Pathfinders, whose 54 years of residential treatment for alco-Diego holism is the oldest in town. E The program serves men who, \sim at the time of entry, have been tor General's attention." Milsop's initial complaints

to Pathfinders concerned wet spots and mold under dilapidated carpeting in his apartment and the denial to residents of garage spaces. He worried especially about the mold, since medication he takes for rheumatoid arthritis weakens his immune system. Several times in the past, bouts of pneumonia had required him to get urgent hospital care.

Facilities maintenance, however, seemed the least of Shelter Plus Care's problems. Milsop alleged that Pathfinders allowed several of its employees to live in apartments that should have gone to homeless men. And it relied on the residents it served to manage the Streamview Drive apartments. Milsop said he had not been paid for work he had done there.

Milsop, who is alcoholic and bipolar, was living on the streets in August 2001 when he sought help from Shelter Plus Care. By the following spring, he was performing the on-site managerial functions at Streamview. He took over the job suddenly, after the previous manager, Randall Dawson, suffered several strokes at the apartments one day. "The Pathfinders people claimed



Randall had relapsed because of the funny way he was talking and staggering around," said Milsop. "They wanted to throw him out of the program."

By phone, Dawson told me that he remembered his pay for the managerial work being "about \$120 per month." He said that several resident managers before him also got paid program ended up treating Mike Milsop in a very shabby way."

Early this year, Milsop filed a complaint with California's labor commission alleging that Pathfinders owed him \$400 a month in unpaid wages over a three-year period, for a total of \$14,400. After a May 27 hearing, the commission ruled that it could do nothing about the problem and that Milsop would have to seek federal help since the work he had done was for a program funded by the U.S. government.

In a September 1, 2004, letter of recommendation, Richard Burtz, who is the director of the two local Shelter Plus Care facilities, itemized the tasks Milsop had been performing."He monitors...daily routines and conformance to resident guidelines," wrote Burtz, "helps facilitate groups, tracks residents' appointments, shuttles residents to meetings and activities, helps newcomers in their orientation and access to social services, monitors building maintenance needs and services and reports pertinent information to staff."

Especially in the beginning, said Milsop, "I didn't know what I was doing. I had no training." Yet in his work capacity, Milsop eventually received from Shelter Plus Care inti*continued on page 8*

How Did They Get Up on the Roof?


arly one morning in May, Padre Gabriel Rodríguez walked out the front doors of downtown Tijuana's San Francisco de Asís

Catholic Church. When he reached the sidewalk, he turned and looked up to admire the tall, narrow neo-Gothic church, considered one of Tijuana's most beautiful."I was surprised and uncomfortable and mad," he confesses.

Indecipherable black spraypainted characters stained the top 2 feet of the entire 150-foot length of the church's east wall. Shading his eyes from the morning sun, Padre Rodríguez scanned the edifice's upper reaches and grew angrier when he noticed that the tile dome atop the more western of the church's two belfries had also been tagged. Padre Rodríguez. Every wall and building in the neighborhood bears some amount of it. "But not the church," he says. "We have another building that fronts the street, and they paint on that from time to time. But the temple itself? No. Not until now."

Asked why the church has been spared heretofore, the handsome square-faced priest shrugs his shoulders. "Logically, it would be out of respect respect for the church. The graffiti is all over the city, but churches usually are not touched."

But even in Mexico, which is 88 percent Catholic, respect

for churches is apparently waning. "I have a house in Tijuana," says Chicano Park graffiti artist Victor Ochoa, who grew up in Tijuana. "It's in Colonia Buena Vista near the racetrack. There's



a church right across the street, and it gets tagged all the time."

When Padre Rodríguez's anger subsided that first morning, amazement replaced it. "How did they get up on the roof?" he wondered. "They don't make ladders that tall. And once up there, how did they get over the side and up on the dome to paint?"

Back inside the friary, Padre Rodríguez told his confreres about the graffiti. "First we were afraid," he recalls. "We thought that they must have gotten into our house and somehow climbed from roof to roof. But then all the friars thought about it, and we thought that they either broke into the church or maybe were hiding in the church when we locked it up. Then they went up into the bell tower. But they would have had to go past another locked door to get into the tower. So, really, we still aren't certain how they got up there."

Padre Rodríguez reported the graffiti to Tijuana police."They asked us not to erase anything. They wanted to come out and take photos so that they could identify the gang that did this. They say it's usually gangs who do this?

The police needn't have worried. None of the friars fancied climbing the rickety belfry stairs to the roof, then hanging over the edge like a rock climber rappelling a cliff. But during the next few days, Padre Rodríguez and the other Franciscan friars found themselves leaning their heads back, trying

to read the scrawl 100 feet up. "We couldn't make most of it out. It seems to be some kind of code. The one word we could make out was crimen, which means crime, but it was spelled with a K."

From the street looking up, a few other words, neither English nor Spanish, can be picked out: ROKET, EL REKOR, STOREK, TEK, and DREK. "Those are graff names," Ochoa, the graffiti artist, explains, "the names used by the individual taggers. The Kstands for 'Krew.' It was probably a group of guys who did it. The police know that, and they assume that means they're some kind of street gang, but that isn't necessarily the case. They're definitely kids who hang out together. Maybe they

all go to the same school or live in the same neighborhood. Maybe they're just friends. That doesn't make them criminal gang members."

Ochoa knows the graffiti scene on both sides of the border. He was born in East Los Angeles and lived there until, when he was seven, his parents were deported. As a youth in the 1960s, he began painting on walls around Tijuana. But, he insists, he wasn't simply tagging his alias, Kosmos. "I came up in the social justice era," he says. "I would use Old English script to paint messages, stuff like 'Abajo con la migra,' Down with the Border Patrol."

He insists that he would never have tagged a church, but he understands why Krimen,

Roket, and their crew targeted San Francisco de Asís. "The new generation is going for fame," Ochoa explains. "And the more important the building, the more your fame if you tag it. I know that church. It's one of the most prominent churches in Tijuana, and it's very tall. Getting your graff name way up there at the top is an accomplishment for these guys that gives them street fame."

Asked whether he feels solidarity with the kids who tagged the church, Ochoa pauses to think."I do," he answers. "I feel continued on page 12

investors and granting enhanced benefits to pension board members who could wield their influence so that pension underfunding could continue. "We

found that Kroll had been working with Vinson & Elkins on a report that cleared everybody except some subordinate employees," says Aguirre. That was just what the council, paying Kroll's bills, wanted.

Levitt has snowed the city council with platitudes. In one

speech aimed at Aguirre, he rhapsodized, "It's a choice between personal grudges and the community's well-being, between arguing about the past and finding solutions for the future, between cynicism, skepticism, and hope." Ugh. Such Fourth of July oratory would

get laughed off Wall Street, but the Union-Tribune lapped it up and Councilmember Jim Madaffer called it "one of the best speeches I've ever heard." As Eskimos say: mush, mush, mush. Levitt's team did not respond to numerous calls for comment.

Despite its professed Batman mission, Kroll is hardly a paragon of cleanliness. It began in 1972 as a detective agency, employing former federal gumshoes. In the 1980s, it did its snooping in the takeover madness, becoming known as "Wall Street's private eye." Its supercozy client: Drexel Burnham Lambert, the junk bond/takeover firm that employed Mike Milken, the kingpin. In 1988, the Securities and Exchange Commission accused Drexel, Milken, and others of insider trading, fraud, stock manipulation, and other offenses. Later that year, Drexel pleaded guilty to six felonies and paid a \$650 million fine. In 1990, after the junk bond market collapsed, Drexel filed for bankruptcy. That same year, Milken was sentenced to ten years in prison.

According to Connie Bruck, author of The Predators' Ball, Kroll was first hired in the early

1980s"to do background checks on Drexel clients." James B. Stewart, author of Den of Thieves, wrote that Drexel hired Kroll to dish up dirt on Ivan Boesky, the Milken collaborator who also went to prison. Boesky eventually wound up in La Jolla, which he still uses as his base for his world travels. Kroll spied on other Drexel associates, too, said Stewart.

But did Kroll ever peer into Drexel? That Wall Street junk bond/takeover firm was close to entrepreneurs with gambling-industry and organizedcrime backgrounds. For example, as the government was investigating Drexel, big swingers would take out full-page ads lauding the firm. One such ad featured two characters who had been instrumental in funding Carlsbad's La Costa, then an organized crime hangout, with money from the Teamsters Central States pension fund. 

Kroll has branched out from detective work to forensic accounting, personnel back-

ground screening, drug testing, security engineering, corporate restructuring, and electronic data recovery. Jules Kroll, the company founder, stayed close to Frederick Joseph, former head of Drexel. Joseph and his minions, now with another firm, assisted Kroll Inc. in its 2003 buyout of Zolfo Cooper, which is handling the Enron reorganization, as well last year's deal in which the insurance broker Marsh & McLennan purchased Kroll for \$1.9 billion.

After Drexel's demise, the detective firm, then called Kroll Associates, ran into financial trouble. According to press reports, it was bailed out by insurance giant American International Group, with which it still has a snug relationship. A Kroll spokesperson acknowledges that in 1993, American International had a minority position in Kroll and remains a client today.

Both American International and Kroll's parent, Marsh & McLennan (called Marsh Mac), are being investigated by Eliot Spitzer, New York's attorney general. Last October, Spitzer accused Marsh Mac of fraudulent self-dealing and bid-rigging. American International was one of the companies said to be involved in the bid-rigging that included a Bermuda insurance company. Early this year, Marsh Mac settled the charges with a payment of \$850 million, but Spitzer is still investigating. American International (the

same firm that refused to fully fund any settlement San Diego may make with Roque de la Fuente) is under investigation by both Spitzer and the Securities and Exchange Commission. One subject is dubious accounting that may have inflated earnings by \$3 billion in the last five years, according to the Wall Street Journal. Part of the probe revolves around another Bermuda-based insurance company in which the company has a 50 percent stake.

Offshore intertwinings are incestuous in the insurance industry. Spitzer told a U.S. Senate subcommittee last year that Bermuda insurance operations created "numerous opportunities for secrecy and insider dealings." Insurance companies do business in "offshore havens" to evade state regulation, Spitzer said. He pointed to four offshore companies that Marsh Mac had helped create. There is a subplot that Forbes

says is "worthy of a private-eye novel." After Marsh Mac bought Kroll, it ousted its chief executive and put Kroll's top exec, Michael Cherkasky, in the top job at the parent. Cherkasky was formerly Spitzer's boss in the Manhattan district attorney's office, is his tennis pal,

and has contributed to his campaigns. "Did Marsh Mac buy Kroll thinking it was an insurance policy against an impending crackdown by New York attorney general Spitzer?" asks Forbes.

Will Kroll's sleuths look into that?

mate details about at least 25 of his fellow residents. Other resident employees and volunteers had received the same information. Milsop showed me a list of program participants living at both the Streamview facility and the second Shelter Plus Care residence facility, which is on Grimm Street in North Park. Next to each name were several items of personal information, including financial sources and social security numbers. Another list displayed the psychoactive medications that each resident was supposed to be taking.



Milsop managed the records of resident Bob Dietrich, and the two later became friends. Milsop said he noticed that Dietrich's rent was being covered by several different sources, eventually provoking him to include misappropriation of funds in his complaints to the Inspector General. Dietrich picked up the story, saying that the San Diego County Serial Inebriate Program ordered him to enter Shelter Plus Care in 2000 or else go to jail. He thought the Serial Inebriate Program paid all his rent but that Housing and Urban Development was kicking in too. For food, Dietrich said he relied on general relief checks of \$150 a month. But Shelter Plus Care, he says, took \$48 of that as well. "I had to go out," he said, "and scrounge around for food in Dumpsters and other places like I did when I was homeless."

Burtz, the program's director, said that Housing and Urban Development requires that 30 percent of any income Shelter Plus Care residents receive be

used to pay for their housing. Milsop also challenged a Shelter Plus Care promise that each of its residents would

receive personal "case management." No one from Pathfinders even made a hospital visit to a resident who had to have cancer surgery, Milsop said. "What kind of case management is that?"

Does the program contract with psychiatric social workers to monitor residents? "No, I do it all myself," said Burtz, going on to indicate that he was responsible for monitoring sometimes more than 30 residents.

"But not all the time," said Milsop."Burtz has hung up on me when I've called him on weekends. Then I ended up taking the guys who get suicidal to the crisis center by myself."

Burtz works out of an office at the Grimm Street facility. He is a California-certified alcohol and drug-abuse counselor. Burtz admitted that "suicidal ideation is not uncommon among alcoholic and drugaddicted men, especially when they are also mentally ill. They might go off their medication, or its effects start to wear off.

making the dosage wrong."

But the case management that Shelter Plus Care provides is substantial "to the degree that residents accept it," according to Burtz. He cited referrals he makes for residents to vocational training programs at San Diego City College and the Regional Occupational Program. He said he makes sure they get appropriate medical attention and mental health assistance through such facilities as UCSD's Gifford Clinic. And he collaborates with the Solutions Consortium and St. Vincent de Paul's How to Live program.

In early June, two months after the Inspector General's office opened its investigation, Milsop finally received answers to complaints he had first made in December 2002. The letter denied the legitimacy of the complaints about Pathfinders' staff living in quarters earmarked for program participants and about withholding case management services from tenants. The letter did not respond to Milsop's allegations of fund misappropriation.

Although Burtz said he could not comment on the case histories of individual residents, he clearly was frustrated with Milsop, Dietrich, and others who had complained loudly in the past. "You have to understand," he told me, "where these people are in life. We can't reach everybody. It's too bad."

"The Pathfinders people ask us," said Milsop," "Where's your gratitude?' And they say our complaints stem only from alcoholic resentments." The Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous, which inspires regular early-morning meetings at Streamview, maintains that resentments are the greatest incitements for recovering alcoholics to drink again.

The last point addressed in the June 3 letter Milsop received from Housing and Urban Development concerned a claim that his eviction was unfair. The letter cited Milsop's relapse into drinking as the real reason for his eviction, not retaliation over his complaints, as he contended. Milsop admitted that he had relapsed but claimed he recovered quickly and had remained sober since then.

Bob Dietrich, contacted last week, said that Milsop challenged his eviction in superior court and lost. Dietrich believed that after Milsop was evicted, he left San Diego to live with family members in Lake Tahoe. Dietrich has not heard from his friend since.

solidarity with them in the fact that they want to express themselves. I feel solidarity with them in the art form that they've chosen. I don't feel solidarity with them when it comes to vandalism."

Ochoa, whose works can be seen at Chicano Park, Centro Cultural de la Raza in Balboa Park, and the Chula Vista Library, paints only on what he calls "permission walls." At one time, he sat on the City of Tijuana's graffiti commission. During his tenure, he organized GraffCon 2000. Hundreds of graffiti artists descended on Tijuana to paint the six miles of fence surrounding Tijuana International Airport."We had guys come down from Los Angeles and from as far away as Arizona, New Mexico, even New York, as well as a few hundred Tijuana artists," Ochoa boasts.

Despite that success, Ochoa resigned from the commission in frustration. "The other members," he recalls, "kept referring to graffiti as shit: 'What are we going to do to get this shit off our walls?' 'How are we going to stop these gang members from painting this shit all over our city?' I tried to tell them, 'It's not shit to them. Ask any kid what he's looking at when he rides the bus to school in the morning. He tells you he's looking at the fresh tags on the walls. Because for them it's art, it's beautiful, it's legitimate selfexpression.' "

Legitimate or not, Padre Rodríguez and his confreres didn't want it on their church. But to clean it off or paint over it themselves would be too dangerous, to pay professionals too expensive. They must have committed the matter to prayer, because God sent a savior."We have a very wealthy family in our parish," Padre Rodríguez explains, "and one of the daughters is getting married soon. The family has offered to pay to have the church painted before the wedding."

Pigskin Preview

ollege football, hereabouts, kicks off on Saturday with UCLA (6-5 last year) playing San Diego State (4-8 last year) at Qualcomm. The game will be televised on ESPN2.

We need to clear the decks, people. There's a lot of chickenshit to swamp out of the hen house by game day. As you've probably surmised, I'm talking about the NCAA mascot situation.

Football fans are familiar with the NCAA's recent ban on mascots. Here's their official communiqué: "The presidents and chancellors who serve on the NCAA Executive Committee have adopted a new policy to prohibit NCAA colleges and universities from displaying hostile and abusive racial/ethnic/national origin mascots, nicknames or imagery at any of the 88 NCAA championships."

"People keep saying that Muslims are not voicing their opinion by condemning terrorism. This is because Fox News is not coming here to ask us our opinions," said Usman Khan, a volunteer and congregant at the Islamic Center of San Diego (ICSD). "Ask anyone here

what they understand Islam to be, and they will condemn terrorism."

Khan often speaks at local colleges and high schools about Islam. "We want to represent the peaceful faith. Yes, there are bad Muslims, but you can't fault Islam for that. There are bad Christians and bad Jews. Do we fault Christianity with Hitler, who used the Bible to justify his actions? Do we blame Christians because of the KKK? Do people hold the Jews accountable because of Baruch Goldstein?" (In 1994, Goldstein killed 29 Arab worshippers and injured 100 in the Cave of the Patriarchs, a site holy to both Muslims and Jews.) Khan said that 1.2 billion Muslims should not be blamed for the action of a few extremists.

Part of the problem, stated Khan, is that the media indicts Muslims."I listen to local talk radio, such as Roger Hedgecock and Rick

Roberts. They misquote Islam and spread false ideas about what we believe. I have tried to call them, but they either hang up on me or leave me on hold," said Khan. "Muslims get blamed more than any other group. After the Oklahoma bombing, people instantly accused Islamic terrorists. But there is no such thing as Islamic terrorism." Khan said the terrorists are motivated over political issues. "The problems in the Middle East that cause terrorism are because the people are oppressed by dictators and past western colonization. It is a political issue. There is nothing Islamic about terrorism. We don't call the IRA bombings Catholic terrorism." Khan said that the beliefs of Islam are not compatible with terrorism.

Khan, who brought up these topics, began to steer the conversation from terrorism. "I get tired of every interview or speech I do that focuses on terrorism," said Khan. "When I visited a local high school, a student asked, 'Is Saddam [Hussein] your uncle?' When I spoke at a nearby college, someone asked if I knew where Osama Bin Laden was. Everywhere I go I'm asked, 'How do you feel about 9/11?' Any American would be saddened by what happened."

Khan spoke about the relationship Muslims have with other faiths. "Muslims have a special respect for Jews and Christians. We believe in many of the same principles," said Khan. "But we believe the message of Jesus was distorted [by Christians] to make Jesus into God. Muslims do not believe a human should be worshiped. Jesus was a prophet who was born to a virgin. Jesus called people toward righteousness. The Bible is proven to be edited and revised."

ICSD's small parking lot filled quickly. Most worshippers parked several blocks away to attend the Friday prayer service. As people moved toward the building, chanting echoed through the speakers: prayers were about to begin. Men bowed and prayed before they entered the Masallah. (Masallah, the room where prayers are conducted, means "place of praver" in Arabic.) All the men removed their shoes, a requirement to enter the room. A washroom allowed the men to wash their feet before they entered. Women are not allowed in

the Masallah, but take a separate staircase to a one-way mirrored balcony where they are not visible. Women wore head coverings and most wore face-covering veils.

Inside the Masallah, red carpet dominated the room, which was void of furniture. After the chanted prayer, Imam Taha Hassan led the congregation in prayers as they faced the eastern wall, toward Mecca. The men responded to Hassan's prayers as they kneeled and bowed their heads. "Fear Allah as he should be feared," began Imam Hassan's message. "Today's talk is about a subject that concerns all of us. It is a message about marriage. In Islam, the family is the heart of the Muslim community." Hassan's message outlined the responsibilities of men and women in marriage. These responsibilities included loyalty, honesty, love, mercy, and good manners to one another.

After service, most of the men left the Masallah, although several stayed to continue to pray.

Many congregants gathered in a cafeteria for lunch. "I've been here for almost a year," said Imam Hassan, who moved from Denver. "The Muslim community is much larger here in San Diego than in Colorado. The local mosques serve a community of 60,000 to 100,000 Muslims." Muslims attend the mosques that are closest to them. "If I am closer to another mosque at prayer time, I will stop and pray there."

I asked Usman Khan what he believed about the afterlife. "I don't know if I am going to heaven. That is why I'm doing good deeds now. You have to do good deeds to go to heaven," replied Usman Khan. "Heaven will be a place no eye can imagine or ear hear. The women will be beautified in heaven. Men can have more than one woman in heaven. The women of paradise are something that is there for you if you want that. But the most beautiful thing in heaven is seeing your Lord." — Drew Ĕ. Goodmanson

• ne thing I know that Mom never said to Pop: "Dear, don't you think you need a hobby?" The old man has been a hobby nut ever since I can remember. When I was a child, it was model trains in the basement rec room. As I lurched into adolescence, it was ships in bottles. Now, Mom tells me that he's "into stamps." Perfect. My nine-year-old adores his

grandpa, and stamp collecting is something they could do together without Pop fretting about Liam breaking his mainmast. Down past the Mission, I found

Larry Keene holding the fort at Henri's Stamp Shop (619-280-4460) the oldest in San Diego. "Basi-

cally," said Keene, "all you need to start is a stock book that has pockets in it. And stamp tweezers — they're specially made for holding stamps. That way, you don't get finger marks on them. Never use eyebrow tweezers — they have sharp edges, and if you twist them a little, they'll poke a hole in the stamp. The stamp tweezers don't have those sharp points."

Keene sells three styles of stamp tweezers, all priced at **\$3.95**: a round, wide-headed model, a squarehead, and a narrow-head. "The wide, round-headed ones are especially good for beginners or children," he noted. "The narrow ones are a little more advanced. Sometimes, what's best is whichever you first start using, because you get used to it."

The cheapest way to store stamps, said Keene, "is with a display page. They fit into any three-ring binder, which most people have kicking around the house. I sell display pages for \$4.50 for a package of five twosided pages. The seven- and five-pocket arrangements are the most popular, because they hold the most single stamps." (The Post Office, he noted, will sometimes sell a sheet of stamps that includes an extra picture around the border, so that the collector is encouraged to keep the whole sheet intact.) "When you get more advanced, you can get illustrated albums - you match up the right stamp with the right picture on each page. The smallest albums, semi-illustrated, run around \$25, and they can get up into the thousands. World album sets, which have 38 parts and start in 1840 with the first

stamp ever made, can cost \$3000. Or, you can specialize in a country say, Italy — and they sell the album in sections by date. The sections run around \$40 each, so some countries might run into the hundreds."

But he was quick to remind me that "you don't

have to spend a lot of money. You can take those three-ring binders and attach the stamps with hinges in any order you want. A stamp hinge [\$2.25 for a package of about 1000] is a little peelable sticker with a folded tab on it. You attach the sticker to the album and then moisten the tab and lay the stamp on the tab. They're used mostly for inexpensive or used stamps. They allegedly don't do any damage to the stamp, but they do leave a mark in the gum of an unused stamp. For valuable stamps, that bothers some people."

In that case, mounts might be a better option — mounts are individual clear plastic

pockets that can be stuck to an album via a sticky backing. "Some people put everything, used and unused, in the mounts. But is it worth it to put a stamp that's worth **\$.05** or **\$.10** in a **\$.07** or **\$.08** mount? Maybe it is, if it's aesthetically more pleasing to you. But in general, unused stamps that have never had a hinge mark should be placed in mounts."

When it comes to finding out about the stamps themselves, there's pretty much one authority, said Keene: The Scott Stamp Catalog (**\$56.99**). "The catalog lists all the different stamps that are kept and issued by all the different countries. It gives a description of the stamp, tells the year issued, the value for used and unused — used means it's been cancelled and taken off an envelope." The values, he explained, "are assuming the stamp is in good condition. If it's torn or creased, it's worth less."

The catalog also includes the perforation measurement. "That means the number of teeth along the edge of the stamp in a 20-millimeter length. Stamp collectors use a perforation gauge to measure this, since the same stamp will sometimes have been

released with different perforation measurements. Back in 1908, the U.S. had a stamp that was Perf 12, but the sheets came apart too easily. They changed it to a Perf 10, but the sheets were too hard to tear apart. So they moved to a Perf 11, which seems to be ideal." And the differences are part of what keeps the collecting interesting

interesting.

I knew Liam would start dreaming about super-valuable stamps like the ones in *Charade*, so I asked Keene about them. "Most stamps are probably in the 'few cents' category. But they can go up. There are rare stamps worth hundreds of thousands of dollars. Still, there's a big bridge between inexpensive and even medium-expensive stamps. We rarely run into stamps that are even **\$100-\$200**. Supply and demand determines the price. You could have a stamp from a country that hardly anybody collects, and even if there were only 1000 ever made, it might be worth only **\$4-\$5**. But a popular stamp might be worth **\$30-\$500**, even if 100,000 were made."

Subject matter also helps dictate price. 'There's a set of stamps from the '30s showing the Graf Zeppelin. The U.S. issued them in a \$.65, a \$1.30, and a \$2.60 stamp. There are probably 35,000 to 45,000 complete sets, and they get \$1500 to \$2000," because people want them. "Airships were a popular subject, and they've stayed popular with the stamp-collecting public, even after everybody else forgot about them. The two most popular subjects for collecting now are trains and birds." These days, said Keene, "What a lot of countries are doing is issuing sheets of 10 or 20 stamps that have four or six different pictures on them per sheet. They do a lot of topical things, like dinosaurs or flowers. Even poor countries put out gaudy stuff like that, and it's just to get collectors' money."



On Tuesday, June 19, 1999, the San Diego City Council went into secret session to consider concessions demanded by San Diego Padres owner John Moores. Although the closed-door meeting had been billed as a discussion about "real property interests in the East Village area of downtown San Diego," the topic was the granting to Moores of almost \$5 million worth of "modifications" to the Padres lease at Qualcomm Stadium in Mission Valley.

Confidential minutes of the meeting show that all councilmembers except Juan Vargas attended, including Valerie Stallings, who, later disclosures reveal, had 90 days earlier, on March 31, reaped thousands of dollars by selling stock in Neon Systems, a Texas company controlled by Moores. In November 1999, four days before the council again secretly considered granting the Moores concessions, Stallings again purchased stock in Neon.







"WHAT I TAKE TO A HOSPITAL IS DIFFERENT FROM

ave your friends and neighbors looked weighed down, put upon, or bent low to the ground lately? Perhaps they are! After all, many of the people we see around us tote a good deal of gear around with them: Chainsaws and helmets, toolbelts and chests, clown shoes and rubber noses. These are just some of the implements people use to earn their daily bread.

To find out more about the tools people use, and the ways they use them, I tracked down seven men and women working in seven different professions and asked them to describe their jobs, the tools it took to do them, and any rituals and superstitions that might have built up around those tools. Then, in order to see just how burdensome those jobs could be, I calculated the precise weight of those tools — down to the nearest ounce. Below, my results:

FRANNIE Clown

When I get started doing my makeup, I give myself an hour and a half just to put on my face. I need another 15 to 20 minutes to put on my costume. Then I gather my things and pack up my car. I allow myself at least an hour to get to a program. I'm always fashionably early.

I put my makeup on more or less the same way every time. After you "cut out" the white design you use for your base, you put the colors on, and after the colors, you have to set it, because it's all greasepaint. You set it with baby powder, then you brush that off and start applying sparkles. A clown is supposed to be completely covered when he or she goes out to be a clown. No skin

showing through; it's all makeup and costume. Once in a while I'll take off my gloves to do some face painting, or something like it. My costume goes: blouse, bloomers, apron, socks, shoes, collar, and wig, in that order. Then I fill my pockets. Balloons and squeakers, little noisemakers, differ-

ent types of clown rings, business cards, stickers. That sort of thing. Then I have to load my car up. I put in table and chair, my bubbles and balloons, my electric pump, and the cart I use to push this stuff around in.

Of course, what I take to a hospital is different from what I'd take to a birthday party. I do lots of room visits in the hospitals, so I don't need my table and my chair. A lot of times, I'll prepare 200 balloons before I leave in the morning. I get them ready beforehand because I sometimes do three or four hospitals back to back, and I'll do dozens of balloon animals in each one.

When you're a clown, you stay in makeup until you get home. So driving home from work, you're still a clown. And, trying to drive in clown shoes, let me tell you.... When I do get home, I take the wig off first, then the costume. The makeup is greasepaint, so getting it off involves baby oil and baby wipes. And the older and more wrinkled I get, the longer it takes. These days, it takes me anywhere from 20 minutes to a half an hour.

My character, Frannie the Clown, is the child I never had. So trust me, if there's something out there Frannie wants, then Frannie gets it. I have pretty much all of the state-of-the-art equipment. When I have old things I don't want or need anymore, I'll give them to new clowns. Frannie the Clown gets a new wig every month or two months, and I give my old wigs to churches, children, other clowns. I used to wear red hair all the time. These days, I have bright yellow hair. I used to say, "Blondes have more fun, but redheads get the job done." And now that Frannie's a blonde, I say, "Blondes have more fun and they get the job done!"

DAN WHITE

Mountain Rescue Team Leader

I've been a team member of San Diego Mountain Rescue for 13 years. I'm a systems analyst for Xerox by day, but I'm always on call, and I participate in roughly 30 rescue operations a year.

A mountain rescue team is composed of the leader, a gofer, a litter attendant, a hauler, a rigger, and a safety man. Aside from the team leader, everyone can do everyone else's job. There are no specialists. When I'm called for a job, I first have to come home and put my pack together. And what I pack depends on the nature of the operation. If I know that it's going to be a technical call, I'll pack the majority of my rock gear. Sometimes we do urban searches, where we just walk down streets and alleys. In that case, I'll bring a much lighter pack. But we do have what we call a standard field pack, which includes things like a firstaid kit, a compass, map, GPS, a Swiss Army knife. It's a basic, selfsufficient kind of pack.

When I assemble my pack, I organize it a specific way. That way, when I'm in the field, if I need my first-aid kit, then I know right where it's at, or if I need my technical gear, it's always there for me to find it right away. When you're packing, you want to think about evening out the weight distribution and about getting the weight-center of the pack to be lower and closer to your back. My heavy, technical gear will typically go in first. And you always want the stuff that you're going to need quickly on the top. The first-aid kit is always on the top and ready to grab. Also my food, because we rarely stop and have lunch; it's we more like graze on power bars and trail mix, stuff like that. Water should always be handy. Sometimes I use water bottles, and sometimes I use a device that has the hose connected to it.

The pack itself is just a typical internal frame backpack. When we go out in the field, we wear blue pants, a warm shirt, and boots, plus the backpack. That's about it. It doesn't take me long to get ready, because the stuff in my garage is pretty well organized. Usually, from the time I get home to when I'm packed, changed, and ready to go,

about half an hour goes by. Most times, it has to be quick. I don't unpack after a job, because usually when I come home from a search I'm pretty beat. It's not uncommon to get a call at 10 o'clock at night. Then we'll go

out, search all night, and get home first thing in the morning. You just crash out.

My favorite piece of gear, I think, is my ice axe. We were on quite a few rescues in the San Bernardinos this year; it

came in handy. But all of my equipment is easy to use and lightweight. Because when you're on an operation, you're always concerned with volume and weight. Whether you're on a technical rescue or you're out in the field, you always want the smallest and lightest. And San Diego has a lot of brush, so we often find ourselves brush-crawling. We call it "manzanita stomping." So if you have a big old pack that weighs a lot, you'll feel like you're dying. I'd say my average pack weight is 30 to 35 pounds, depending on the rescue. (Unless you're doing winter rescue, in which case the pack weighs quite a bit more, because you have to have a stove, a shelter, and warmer clothes on top of all the other stuff. The winter pack is closer to 50 or 60 pounds.)

I've had a lot of my equipment for a while, so



it's kind of older and heavier, but it's still in pretty good shape. There's always something lighter and smaller. Some new titanium gadget, something ultralight that's just been invented. But I have to wait until

something breaks before I buy the nifty new version. One of the things that you specifically think about when you pack your pack is that you don't want anything that you're not going to use. Typically if I have

something that I haven't used in a couple of years, then I'll either sell it or give it away.

It's about efficiency. Having what you need but not having too much.

do my job. But I think if you ask any law-enforcement officer to pick one tool, then the firearm is the one that makes all the difference in the world.

I've used my gun, but I've never had to fire it. I'm lucky. I've used the gun to gain compliance in various situations. Knock on wood, the bulletproof vest is the one thing that I've never had to use. Yet.

I've been hooking on and off since 1989, and every night when I go to work, I make sure I have protection: I carry a pair of scissors, a screwdriver, and a water gun filled with bleach and rubbing alcohol.



and take the wetsuit off.

It's important to rinse all your gear after you're done diving, get the salt off of it. All the stuff gets rinsed off and dried and then you spread it out and hang it up and pack it away for the next time. You also have to spray the metal stuff — the regulators and computers and lights — with silicon spray so it won't rust.

I really like my drysuit, which is exactly what it sounds like. It's a dry suit. It keeps all the water off you so you stay totally dry. It means you can get dressed up in nice, warm, fuzzy underwear at home, go down to the dive site, leave your clothes on, and just put your suit over them. That's a lot more comfortable.

There isn't any equipment that I wish I had. I own a dive store. I've got all the toys I want! But the things I have that I never use are



my knife and my emergency backup tank. I always carry an extra tank with an extra regulator, just in case mine goes bad. But so far, in 18 years of diving, I've never had to use it. The knife I have just in case. You wouldn't fight a shark or anything with it, but maybe I'll have to cut myself out of fishing



I've been doing comedy for six years, and my comedy show runs every Tuesday at Lestat's



Coffeehouse in Normal Heights. So I write all week long and go through my jokes, list them, and I categorize them by women, politics, inventions, animals you know, whatever themes seem to be emerging in the jokes that I'm doing. Before each show, I rehearse them once or twice. I used to rehearse all week long, probably 50 times. But lately, I've been doing my rehearsing about 20 minutes before each show, running through it twice, just before I go onstage. Even the new material. I write new stuff all the time, and your brain just becomes more attuned to memorizing stuff.

I don't have any superstitions about my preparation, but I do like to wear the same shoes and socks. You can't do comedy in uncomfortable shoes! If your shoes are really heavy, your mind focuses on that you can get bogged down by the weight of your own feet.

I just bought a new pair of performing shoes. I was at the mall in these dress shoes. Doing jumping jacks in them. You know, they almost have to feel like sneakers. And I wear these black dress socks. They're not long, so they're not hot, and I wear the same pair every time I do an important show. 



LONG-AGO SAN DIEGO

THE BATTLE OF SAN DIEGO BAY, PART III

In 1803, Coronado's North Island was a wide brown hump across the channel from the tip of Ballast Point. Ships entering the bay had to navigate through acres of kelp offshore, then a bottleneck between the island and the point. The passage was much narrower than today: "not a cable's length wide," said Captain William Shaler, of the *Lelia*

by Jeff Smith am Shaler, of the *Lelia Byrd*, referring to woven hemp anchor-ropes that averaged 200 yards. Speaking from the safety

of hindsight, since he had to run a gauntlet past the cannons, Shaler also recalled a "sorry battery of eight pounders at the entrance."

The battery was Fort Guijarros, a massive, earthen structure at the base of Ballast Point. A man-made ramp rose like a pyramid to 40 feet. Twenty feet above the ramp, cannons faced the channel from gunports. The merlons, battlement walls between the ports, stood eight feet high. Cannons were rated by the weight of the ball. At least one of them, called "El Jupiter," was a nine-pounder.

A nine-pound ball could put a good-sized hole in a ship. Cannonieres had other tactics. They'd link two balls to a short chain, or flat metal bar. Fired from the same tube, whirling "chain shots" and "bar shots" could bring down a sail. Soldiers would also grill a cannonball over hot coals. The heated ball could hit the hull, or just a sail, and set a ship on fire.

"If they didn't have proper ammunition," says Ron May, board chairman of the Fort Guijarros Museum Foundation, "they'd ram something down the barrel and aim for the ship's rigging. At Fort Guijarros, they'd try to disable the ship — slow it down so it could be boarded — but not sink it. The last thing they'd want is a sunken ship in such a narrow channel."

Although some could range up to half a mile, most cannons weren't accurate beyond a "half-pistol shot," about 100 yards. To improve distance and accuracy, especially for artillery at or near sea level, cannoniers would skip a cannonball across the waves. It might have been a "raking shot," fired "between wind and water," that struck the *Lelia Byrd* during the Battle of San Diego Bay.

For years after, Spanish officials referred to the 175-ton vessel as *papagayo*, which means "parrot," but also a red fish "full of venomous prickles."

The *Lelia Byrd* sailed into the bay March 17, 1803. As it passed the "hooked promontory" of Ballast Point, Captain Shaler was surprised that no one greeted him from Guijarros. An hour later, around dusk, the ship dropped anchor about a mile from the fort — near the foot of Kellogg Street, some say within "hailing distance" of the shore.

The next morning, thirteen soldiers on horseback stood in a formal row on the beach. Their leader, a solemn man in a silverspangled uniform, shouted into a megaphone. "Send

your launch," he said in Spanish, referring to a large utility rowboat. "We are coming aboard."

As they climbed onto the ship, the cavalrymen formed two lines facing each other. They drew their swords and doffed their hats. Then the leader came on deck. Shoulders back, chest forward, he pranced down the companionway between his escorts' rigid salutes.

"Another minor Spanish official," thought Richard Cleveland, Shaler's business partner. "Such a ridiculous display of a little 'brief authority," Cleveland added, quoting *Measure for Measure*, "I never before witnessed."

"More Boston traders...*Bostones!*" Don Manuel Rodriguez, Commandant of the San Diego Presidio, must have thought, as he and his soldiers tried to establish authority on the Yankee brig, "and more lies."

Spain permitted no foreign trade

on Pacific shores. But since 1800, three New England vessels had come to San Diego to deal, on the sly, for sea otter furs. They'd exchange trinkets, household goods, and blue ribbons with natives and the friars for a pelt worth up to \$80 — \$1000 in today's currency — in China.

Each vessel had an excuse for anchoring. On August 25, 1800, the *Betsy*, the first American ship to enter San Diego Bay, needed wood and water. In June, 1801, the *Enterprise* asked for "bread and other foodstuffs" before sailing to China. Both vessels left on friendly terms. If they smuggled furs, no one knew.

The *Alexander* arrived February 26, 1803, with an urgent excuse. Nine of its 19 crewmen had scurvy — or so their captain claimed. They *must* convalesce on land. Rodriguez gave them eight days, but they couldn't go near

the Presidio, three miles inland. On the fifth day, suspecting trouble, Rodriguez and an armed guard boarded the frigate. They found 491 furs in a storeroom near the main mast.

"Contrabando!" Rodriquez declared. He ordered the Alexander to leave at once, and locked the pelts in the Presidio warehouse. That was March 3. Two weeks later, the Lelia Byrd hove to off Point Loma.

As his soldiers stood at attention, Rodriguez inspected Shaler's passport and took the Captain's request for 24 hens, flour, salt, and four butchered cattle. Rodriguez said the crew could come ashore, but not go inland. And once they had their supplies, they must not "delay a moment in leaving the port."

To prevent another Alexander affair, Rodriguez ordered Sergeant Joaquin Arce and five soldiers to remain on the brig: Let no San Diegan on board. Inspect the launch and rowboats after every trip

ashore. If Arce found any furs, "I should be advised."

After the Commandant left "with great ceremony," Cleveland and a small party rowed to the beach. They "rambled" south, on a narrow, cobblestone path toward the fort. When no one met them, they went inside and "availed ourselves of the opportunity to ascertain its strength."

They found "eight brass nine-pounders" mounted on wooden carriages. (Cleveland tends to inflate numbers in his account; later he says there were only three, most likely a more accurate number.) The cannons were in good shape, "but there was no appearance of their having been used for a long time." Not wanting to get caught snooping around the battery, the party returned to the ship at sunset, "having had an agreeable excursion."

Back on board, Sergeant Arce, "an intelligent young man," told about the 491 furs in the warehouse.

The next time he saw

the Commandant, Cleveland suggested a trade. Rodriguez wouldn't listen. Cleveland became convinced that, "without it being known to the public," Rodriguez would have made the sale. But since San Diegans "were all spies on each other," he couldn't.

Richard Batman: "That Rodriguez was an honest man who believed in enforcing the rules didn't occur to Cleveland."

Rodriguez never sold the furs. They rotted in the warehouse. The putrid stench that seeped through the walls and permeated the entire compound prompting grumbles from all 200 inhabitants became a symbol of the Commandant's fortitude. He finally ordered all

491 dumped in the bay. On March 21, the Lelia

Byrd had its supplies. Rodriguez came on board to receive payment. "The ship sails in the morning," he said. Then, in a grand flourish, he wished everyone well.

When he came ashore, rather than ride north to the Presidio, Rodriguez

went to inspect the fort. In the trunk of Jose Velazquez, the Corporal in charge of the battery, he found "19 rolls of counterfeit Bretana cloth, one of cheesecloth, and about six yards of flannel." Foreign goods! He also detected the

scent of otter skins. A quick search uncovered a stack of 40: the New Englanders' share."Suspicious" that more smuggling would happen after dark, Rodriguez, a cadet, and four soldiers began patrolling the beach on horseback.

Around 9:00 p.m., Cleveland feigned panic: a crewman was missing, he told Sergeant Arce. They couldn't leave without him! So Cleveland, the two cabin boys, and the ship's caulker lowered the launch and a small jollyboat and rowed to prearranged locations in silence.

Cleveland came back with several "mission furs." The launch never returned.

As the cabin boys guarded the launch in darkness, the caulker traded with Carlos Rosa, a soldier, for seven otter pelts. Then came the clack

of hooves on cobblestones. Rodriguez!

Rosa grabbed the furs and vanished into thick shrubs. Six horsemen surrounded the caulker and cabin boys. Furious, Rodriguez ordered the smugglers bound hand and foot — and to remain that way all night, guarded by three soldiers. In the morning, the Commandant would return and "reprimand the Captain of this ship for his procedure."

At sunrise, Shaler and Cleveland saw the empty launch beached abreast of their vessel. Cleveland snuck ashore. He spotted the soldiers and their prisoners. Since he had no weapon, and a rescue would have been "imprudent," he returned to the ship and told Shaler. They immediately disarmed the on-board guards and locked them belowdecks. Cleveland and four crewmen, "each with a brace of loaded pistols," rowed ashore. Antonio Guillen, one of the guards, went with them, possibly as a Spanish-speaking eye-witness.

surprised the soldiers, shoved pistols at their chests, and demanded the prisoners released. "To prevent mischief," Cleveland dipped Spanish firearms into salty baywater and tossed them on the beach.

As the Yankee party boarded the launch, Guillen broke free. He raced to Fort Guijarros. "The Bostones are sailing — with our men!" he shouted to Velazquez. "What should we do?"

The question was unique. Up to 1803, few ships visited San Diego Bay, and none had tried to escape. Though they hadn't done much lately, cannoniers practiced at small targets - out-ofrange objects at North Island, chunks of kelp in the channel — but never an actual vessel. Plus, shooting at an American brig could constitute an act of war.

But the Lelia Byrd was kidnapping five fellow soldiers. To what purpose? A shanghaied crew? Slit their throats at sea? And then again: could Velazquez

shaler and Cleveland had no options. "Arriving safely on board," writes Cleveland, "our men [were] so indignant at the treatment of their shipmates, as to be ready for the fight." They had, however, a "hazardous" task ahead, "a failure in which would be attended with ruin."

The Lelia Byrd was anchored a mile north of Fort Guijarros. To escape, it would have to sail through the narrow strait between the point and North Island, within close range of the battery. "With a strong wind," writes Cleveland, "the quick passage of the vessel would render the danger trifling, but unfortunately we had not but the last expiring breath of the land breeze." This would only give them "steerage way," only enough movement to keep the ship on course.

It would take almost 45 minutes to weigh anchor, come about, and sail past the fort against the incoming tide. The Battle of San Diego Bay, in other words, took place in slow motion.

The *Lelia Byrd* had six three-pound, portable swivel-guns. These made more noise than damage, even to nearby targets. Shaler ordered them armed and mounted along the ship's starboard side, facing the fort.

Corporal Velazquez, whose smuggling escapades helped trigger it, had an idea: prevent the confrontation without violence. When the *Lelia Byrd* crew climbed to the upper yardarm and unfurled the topsails, Velazquez mustered troops at the battery and raised the Spanish flag. Then he loaded a blank cartridge into "El Jupiter" and lit the fuse.

Shaler and Cleveland saw the flash and heard the report rumble up the hillside. Smoke hung like a low cloud over the battery, and flocks of seagulls took flight. But the *Lelia Byrd* continued toward the neck of the bay.

Velazquez reloaded, this time with a ninepound ball. He fired the universal warning: a blast across the ship's bow. The "solid shot" cracked the sky. But the *Lelia Byrd* nudged forward.

During the next 30 minutes Velazquez fired several times. Though most shots missed, one snared some rigging, slowing the ship even more. The *Lelia Byrd* didn't return fire. When it almost reached the fort, a missile struck the hull toward the stern, possibly a low, raking-shot, skimming across the waves.

Shaler and Cleveland quickly crammed the hole with oakum — tarred, old rope fibers. They also made a move to stop the bombardment. Cleveland: "We caused the guard in their uniforms to stand along in the most exposed and conspicuous station."

Cleveland neglects to say that he and Shaler turned the soldiers into human targets. They lashed four to the ship's starboard railing, facing the fort, and tied Sergeant Arce to the mainmast. The prisoners contorted, trying to undo knots. Some mimicked being shot. All begged Velazquez to cease firing. Cleveland says the cannonade continued. Velazquez, who had shot eight rounds up to that point, says he stopped when Sergeant Arce promised the soldiers would be given their swords and set free.

A small crowd gathered near the fort — "came to see the fun," says Cleveland. When the *Lelia Byrd* pulled even with the battery, the prisoners were still bound to the railing. Their screams and frantic twisting showed no hint of freedom.

Suddenly, *Lelia Byrd* blasted a six-cannon broadside. Stones sparked and three-pound balls ricocheted up the ramp. Onlookers scampered away. But the volley did no harm.

Soldiers began to flee the fort. The Lelia Byrd reloaded. The swivel guns roared again, this time with cannonballs and "grapeshot" — small, castiron pellets that erupt like shrapnel. Cleveland: the second salvo "caused the complete abandonment of their guns, as none were fired afterwards; nor could we see any person in the fort, excepting a soldier who stood upon the ramparts, waving his hat, as if to desire us to desist."

It was Velazquez. Soon

The *Lelia Byrd* was well past the breakwater at Ballast Point. Rodriguez rebuked Velazquez for opening fire and, after it had shot back, for not trying to "dismast" the vessel.

Velazquez said he couldn't; he had no "bar shots," referring to cannonballs linked by a metal bar.

"Can your guns reach the frigate from here?" "No sir...out of range."

Battle over. Aware that different versions of what happened were bound to occur, Velazquez hinted that if Rodriguez wanted to get their story straight, just let him know.

The Lelia Byrd moved on. Cleveland: "Having passed out of reach of their cannon, the poor guards saw themselves completely in our power, without the chance of rescue." As the brig rounded Point Loma, crewmen lowered the launch to row the guards ashore and tied their weapons in bundles. Even these signs of liberty couldn't keep the soldiers from "imploring for mercy...nor could they be made to believe, until they were actually on shore, that we intended them no harm."

On safe ground at last, the soldiers embraced each other, crossed themselves, and fell to their knees in prayer. Cleveland, who later boasted about his and Shaler's "humanity and generosity to the guards," says he heard them shout, *Vivan los Americanos.*"

The *Lelia Byrd* sailed south to San Quintin, for repairs, and eventually to Hawaii.

Five days after the incident — though Velazquez swears it was just a "friendly exchange of gifts" — Rodriguez jailed the Corporal for dealing contraband with the Yankees.

The Commandant sold the confiscated goods at an auction for the equivalent of \$212. He gave the money to four Spanish soliders. One would like to believe it was the four trapped "between wind and water," during the Battle of San Diego Bay.



An Appeal to Every Human Mind, Imbued with the Commonest of Common Sense, and the Commonest of Common Humanity

DICKENS ON SLAVERY IN AMERICA: 1842



HE UPHOLDERS OF SLAVERY IN AMERICA - of the atrocities of which system, I shall not write one word for which I have not had ample proof and warrant — may be divided into three great classes.

The first, are those more moderate and rational owners of human cattle, who have come into the possession of them as so many coins in their trading capital, but who admit the frightful nature of the Institution in the abstract, and perceive the dangers to society with which it is fraught: dangers which however distant they may be, or howsoever tardy in their coming on, are as certain to fall upon its guilty head, as is the Day of Judgment.

The second, consists of all those owners, breeders, users, buyers and sellers of slaves, who will, until the bloody chapter has a bloody end, own, breed, use, buy, and sell them at all hazards: who doggedly deny the horrors of the system in the teeth of such a mass of evidence as never was brought to bear on any other subject, and to which the experience of every day contributes its immense amount; who would at this or any other moment, gladly involve America in a war, civil or foreign, provided that it had for its sole end and object the assertion of their right to perpetuate slavery, and to whip and work and torture slaves, unquestioned by any human authority, and unassailed by any human power; who, when they speak of Freedom, mean the Freedom to oppress their kind, and to be savage, merciless, and cruel; and of whom every man on his own ground, in republican America, is a more exacting, and a sterner, and a less responsible des-

pot than the Caliph Haroun Alraschid in his angry robe of scarlet.

The third, and not the least numerous or influential, is composed of all that delicate gentility which cannot bear a superior, and cannot brook an equal; of that class whose Republicanism means, 'I will not tolerate a man above me: and of those below, none must approach too near;' whose pride, in a land where voluntary servitude is shunned as a disgrace, must be ministered to by slaves; and whose inalienable rights can only have their growth in negro wrongs.

It has been sometimes urged that, in the unavailing efforts which have been made to advance the cause of Human Freedom in the republic of America (strange cause for history to treat of!), sufficient regard has not been had to the existence of the first class of persons; and it has been contended that they are hardly used, in being confounded with the second. This is, no doubt, the case; noble instances of pecuniary and personal sacrifice have already had their growth among them; and it is much to be regretted that the gulf between them and the advocates of eman-

cipation should have been widened and deepened by any means: the rather, as there are, beyond dispute, among these slaveowners, many kind masters who are tender in the exercise of their unnatural power. Still, it is to be feared that this injustice is inseparable from the state of things with which humanity and truth are called upon to deal. Slavery is not a whit the more endurable because some hearts are to be found which can partially resist its hardening influences; nor can the indignant tide of honest wrath stand still, because in its onward course it overwhelms a few who are comparatively innocent, among a host of guilty.

The ground most commonly taken by these better men among the advocates of slavery, is

this: 'It is a bad system; and for myself I would willingly get rid of it, if I could; most willingly. But it is not so bad, as you in England take it to be. You are deceived by the representations of the emancipationists. The greater part of my slaves are much attached to me. You will say that I do not allow them to be severely treated; but I will put it to you whether you believe that it can be a general practice to treat them inhumanly, when it would impair their value, and would be obviously against the interests of their masters.'

Is it the interest of any man to steal, to game, to waste his health and mental faculties by drunkenness, to lie, forswear himself, indulge hatred, seek desperate revenge, or do murder? No. All these are roads to ruin. And why, then, do men tread them? Because such inclinations are among the vicious qualities of mankind. Blot out, ye friends of slavery, from the catalogue of human passions, brutal lust, cruelty, and the abuse of irresponsible power (of all earthly temptations the most difficult to be resisted), and when ye have done so, and not before, we will inquire whether it be the interest of a master to lash and maim the slaves, over whose lives and limbs he has an absolute control!

But again: this class, together with that last one I have named, the miserable aristocracy spawned of a false republic, lift up their voices and exclaim 'Public opinion is all-sufficient to prevent such cruelty as you





denounce.' Public opinion! Why, public opinion in the slave States IS slavery, is it not? Public opinion, in the slave States, has delivered the slaves over, to the gentle mercies of their masters. Public opinion has made the laws, and denied the slaves legislative protection. Public opinion has knotted the lash, heated the branding-iron, loaded the rifle, and shielded the murderer. Public opinion threatens the abolitionist with death, if he venture to the South; and drags him with a rope about his middle, in broad unblushing noon, through the first city in the East. Public opinion has, within a few years, burned a slave alive at a slow fire in the city of St. Louis; and public opinion has to this day maintained upon the bench that estimable judge who charged the jury, impanelled there to try his murderers, that their most horrid deed was an act of public opinion, and being so, must not be punished by the laws the public sentiment had made. Public opinion hailed this doctrine with a howl of wild applause, and set the prisoners free, to walk the city, men of mark, and influence, and station, as they had been before.

Public opinion! what class of men have an immense preponderance over the rest of the community, in their power of representing public opinion in the legislature? The slave-owners. They send from their twelve States one hundred members, while the fourteen free States, with a free population nearly double, return but a hundred and forty-two. Before whom do the presidential candidates bow down the most humbly, on whom do they fawn the most fondly, and for whose tastes do they cater the most assiduously in their servile protestations? The slave-owners always.

Public opinion! Hear the public opinion of the free South, as expressed by its own members in the House of Representatives at Washington. 'I have a great respect for the chair,'

quoth North Carolina, 'I have a great respect for the chair as an officer of the house, and a great respect for him personally; nothing but that respect prevents me from rushing to the table and tearing that petition which has just been presented for the abolition of slavery in the district of Columbia, to pieces.' ---'I warn the abolitionists,' says South Carolina, 'ignorant, infuriated barbarians as they are, that if chance shall throw any of them into our hands, he may expect a felon's death.' — 'Let an abolitionist come within the borders of South Carolina,' cries a third; mild Carolina's colleague; 'and if we can catch him, we will try him, and notwithstanding the interference of all the governments on earth, including the Federal government, we will hang him.'

Public opinion has made this law. — It has declared that in Washington, in that city which takes its name from the father of American lib-

erty, any justice of the peace may bind with fetters any negro passing down the street and thrust him into jail: no offence on the black man's part is necessary. The justice says, 'I choose to think this man a runaway:' and locks him up. Public opinion impowers the man of law when this is done, to advertise the negro in the newspapers, warning his owner to come and claim him, or he will be sold to pay the jail fees. But supposing he is a free black, and has no owner, it may naturally be presumed that he is set at liberty. No: He is Sold to Recompense his Jailer. This has been done again, and again, and again. He has no means of proving his freedom; has no adviser, messenger, or assistance of any sort or kind; no investigation into his case is made, or inquiry instituted. He, a free man, who may have served for years, and bought his liberty, is thrown into jail on no process, for no crime, and on no pretence of crime:

and is sold to pay the jail fees. This seems incredible, even of America, but it is the law.

Public opinion is deferred to, in such cases as the following: which is headed in the newspapers:

'Interesting Law-Case. 'An interesting case is now on trial in the Supreme Court, arising out of the following facts. A gentleman residing in Maryland had allowed an aged pair of his slaves substantial though not legal freedom for several years. While thus living, a daughter was born to them, who grew up in the same liberty, until she married a free negro, and went with him to reside in Pennsylvania. They had several children, and lived unmolested until the original owner died, when his heir attempted to regain them; but the magistrate before whom they were brought, decided that he had no jurisdiction in the case. The owner seized the woman and her children its the night, and carried them to Maryland.'



'Cash for negroes,' 'cash for negroes,' is the heading of advertisements in great capitals down the long columns of the crowded journals. Woodcuts of a runaway negro with manacled hands, crouching beneath a bluff pursuer in top boots, who, having caught him, grasps him by the throat, agreeably diversify the pleasant text. The leading article protests against 'that abominable and hellish doctrine of abolition, which is repugnant alike to every law of God and nature.' The delicate mamma, who smiles her acquiescence in this sprightly writing as she reads the paper in her cool piazza, quiets her

youngest child who clings about her skirts, by promising the boy 'a whip to beat the little niggers with.' — But the negroes, little and big, are protected by public opinion.

Let us try this public opinion by another test, which is important in three points of view: first, as showing how desperately timid of the public

opinion slave-owners are, in their delicate descriptions of fugitive slaves in widely circulated newspapers; secondly, as showing how perfectly contented the slaves are, and how very seldom they run away; thirdly, as exhibiting their entire freedom from scar, or blemish, or any mark of cruel infliction, as their pictures are drawn, not by lying abolitionists, but by their own truthful masters.

The following are a few specimens of the advertisements in the public papers. It is only four years since the oldest among them appeared; and others of the same nature continue to be published every day, in shoals.

'Ran away, Negress Caroline. Had on a collar with one prong turned down.'

'Ran away, a black woman, Betsy. Had an iron bar on her right leg.' 'Ran away, the negro



While upon the subject of ears, I may observe that a distinguished abolitionist in New York once received a negro's ear, which had been cut off close to the head, in a general post letter. It was forwarded by the free and independent gentleman who had caused it to be amputated, with a polite request that he would place the specimen in his 'collection.'

I could enlarge this catalogue with broken arms, and broken legs, and gashed flesh, and missing teeth, and lacerated backs, and bites of dogs, and brands of redhot irons innumerable: but as my readers will be sufficiently sickened and repelled already, I will turn to another branch of the subject.

These advertisements, of which a similar collection might be made for every year, and month, and week, and day; and which are coolly read in families as things of course, and as a part of the current news and small-talk; will serve to show how very much the slaves profit by public opinion, and how tender it is in their behalf. But it may be worth while to inquire how the slaveowners, and the class of society to which great numbers of them belong, defer to public opinion in their conduct, not to their slaves but to each other; how they are accustomed to restrain their passions; what their bearing is among themselves; whether they are fierce or gentle; whether their social customs be brutal, sanguinary, and violent, or bear the impress of civilisation and refinement.

That we may have no partial evidence from abolitionists in this inquiry, either, I will once more turn to their own newspapers, and I will confine myself, this time, to a selection from paragraphs which appeared from day to day, during my visit to America, and which refer to occurrences happening while I was there. The italics in these extracts, as in the foregoing, are my own.

These cases did not all occur, it will be seen, in territory actually belonging to legalised Slave States, though most, and those the very worst among them did, as their counterparts constantly do; but the position of the scenes of action in reference to places immediately at hand, where slavery is the law; and the strong resemblance between that class of outrages and the rest; lead to the just presumption that the character of the parties concerned was formed in slave districts, and brutalised by slave customs.

'Horrible Tragedy. 'By a slip from The Southport Telegraph, Wisconsin, we learn that the Hon. Charles C. P. Arndt,

Member of the Council for Brown county, was shot dead on the floor of the Council Chamber, by James R. Vinyard, Member from Grant county. The affair grew out of a nomination for Sheriff of Grant county. Mr. E. S. Baker was nominated and supported by Mr. Arndt. This nomination was opposed by Vinyard, who wanted the appointment to vest in his own brother. In the course of debate, the deceased made some statements which Vinyard pronounced false, and made use of violent and insulting language, dealing largely in personalities, to which Mr.

by those who saw Vinyard kill Mr. Arndt in the presence of his aged father, who was on a visit to see his son, little dreaming that he was to witness his murder, Judge Dunn has discharged vinyard on bail. The Miners' Free Press speaks in terms of merited rebuke at the outrage upon the feelings of the people of Wisconsin. Vinyard was within arm's length of Mr. Arndt, when he took such deadly aim at him, that he never spoke. Vinyard might at pleasure, being so near, have only wounded him, but he chose to kill him.'

'Murder.

By a letter in a St. Louis paper of the '4th, we notice a terrible outrage at Burlington, Iowa. A Mr. Bridgman having had a difficulty with a citizen of the place, Mr. Ross; a brother-in-law of the latter provided himself with one of Colt's revolving pistols, met Mr. B. in the street, and discharged the contents of five of the barrels at him: each shot taking effect. Mr. B., though horribly wounded,

and dying, returned the fire, and killed Ross on the spot.'

'Terrible Death of Robert Potter.

'From the "Caddo Gazette," of the 12th inst., we learn the frightful death of Colonel Robert Potter....He was beset in his house by an enemy, named Rose. He sprang from his couch, seized his gun, and, in his nightclothes, rushed from the house. For about two hundred yards his speed seemed to defy his pursuers; but, getting entangled in a thicket, he was captured. Rose told him that he intended to act a generous part, and give him a chance for his life. He then told Potter he might run, and he should not be interrupted till he reached a certain distance. Potter started at the word of command, and before a gun was fired he had reached the lake. His first impulse was to jump in the water and dive for it, which he did. Rose was close behind him, and formed his men on the bank ready to shoot him as he rose. In a few seconds he came up to breathe; and scarce had his head reached the surface of the water when it was completely riddled with the shot of their guns, and he sunk, to rise no more!'

'Murder in Arkansas. 'We understand that a severe rencontre came off a few days since in the Seneca Nation, between Mr. Loose, the sub-agent of the mixed band of the Senecas, Quapaw, and Shawnees, and Mr. James Gillespie, of the mercantile firm of Thomas G. Allison and Co., of Maysville, Benton, County Ark, in which the latter was slain with a bowieknife. Some difficulty had for some time existed between the parties. It is said that Major Gillespie brought on the attack with a cane. A severe conflict ensued, during which two pistols were fired by Gillespie and one by Loose. 

'Affair of Honour.



Nestled at the end of a cul-de-sac in Pacific Beach, the two-story house features large picture windows and sliding glass doors that look out upon a patio that is perched above a virtually private beach with a magnificent view of Mission Bay. Although it is not common knowledge, Martinet is aware that should a group of noisy children or a motley bunch of teenagers one day stroll up from the beach and set up chairs and spread out blankets on a portion of his scenic patio, he would have no choice but to

a semicircle to the Ingraham Street bridge. Many beacharea residents are convinced the private encroachments on Sail Bay have been allowed to remain because of the wealth and political clout of persons living there. That clout also is responsible, they say, for the blatant and repeated delaying tactics of the city council — led by former councilman Tom Gade — in implementing a plan for the development of Sail Bay for public use. It cannot be denied that some of San Diego's richest and most influential citizens either now own or used to own condos or homes fronting Sail Bay. In addition to Martinet, an heir to the Purex bleach fortune, and his brother Ronald, who lives a block away, other Sail Bay residents include former PSA Airlines president J. Floyd Andrews; former SeaWorld president George Millay; former congressman, Sentinel newspaper owner, and entrepreneur Clinton McKinnon; his son Dan, owner of

The dredging removed silt from the floor of the bay, which made it deeper and more easily navigable. allow them to stay.

Nearby residents of a bayfront condominium at 3810 Riviera Drive have paid a handsome sum for their homes. They have only to walk down a few steps to enjoy a leisurely walk along the sands of Mission Bay or to swim in their pool. But should they find strangers frolicking in part of the pool, they, like Martinet, would be powerless to do anything about it.

The condominium's swimming pool, Martinet's patio, and the seawalls, landscaping, and bulkheads established by numerous other residents living on a part of Mission Bay called Sail or Crescent Bay share a common predicament: portions of them are on public beach and may be used by the public. But for the benevolence of past San Diego City Councils, the beach encroachments could have — many say should have — been ordered removed by the city.

Sail Bay is on the northwest section of Mission Bay, extending from Verona Court past the Catamaran Hotel in

KSON radio station and a candidate for the congressional seat once held by his father; and Vernon Taylor, owner of a vast number of properties in Pacific Beach. One of the many bayfront condos in the area — a gray, fortresslike structure called Bay Scene — has been, or is, home to such political notables as Congressman Bob Wilson, City Councilman Fred Schnaubelt, and Sheriff John Duffy. Former County Supervisor Lou Conde lives nearby in another condo.

To understand how improvements to homes and condos were developed on what is now public beach, one must go back to 1926, when Mission Bay — then called





At that time the state wanted to promote development of the area but didn't have the funds to do so. A three-member Board of State Harbor Commissioners was appointed, and in an effort to encourage development the commissioners granted two 50-year leases on 25 acres of tidelands on what is now known as Sail Bay. One of the leases, of slightly less than seven acres, was granted to F.T. Scripps, the brother of newspaper czar D.W. Scripps, for a monthly fee of \$8.34. The other lease, of nearly 18 acres, was awarded to Charles K. Johnson for \$33.05 a month. The leases permitted the building of a wide range of private improvements by the lessees, with the stipulation that when they expired on May 31, 1976, the lessees would remove at their own expense "all improvements, buildings, and



structures of whatsoever kind," with the exception of seawalls or bulkheading. In 1929 the California state legislature declared the tidelands and waters of Mission Bay to be a state park. All Mission Bay tidelands, including those leased to private individuals, came under the control of the State Park Division. In 1945 the state granted the tidelands and submerged lands of Mission Bay Park to the city, under the condition that they be used for maritime improvement, construction, education, and recreation. That same year San Diegans approved a \$2 million bond issue for park development that included Mission Bay. The following year extensive dredging operations began.

Clinton McKinnon formed the Crescent Beach Development Association in 1950. It was a nonprofit organization composed of the successors in interest to the Johnson lease; its purpose was to ensure that the lease rent was paid and that the beach "would be used properly," McKinnon says. Nine years later the Catamaran Hotel was completed by William Evans on a parcel of land owned by McKinnon and Vernon Taylor near the northwest corner of Sail Bay.

In 1960 the city and the successors in interest to the Scripps and Johnson leases signed an agreement whereby the city would pay for 21 percent of the cost of further



dredging of the Sail Bay waters, and the lessees would pay the balance. The lease amendment stated clearly that after May 31, 1976, any private structures built by the lessees would be removed by them, so that the city could use the area for an

aquatic park and recreation area. Following the dredging, which removed silt on the floor of the bay, making it deeper and more easily navigable, Sail Bay residents began constructing private piers and docks, enabling many of them to moor their craft

In 1964 the builder of the condominium at 3810 Riviera Drive built a swimming pool beyond his property line and onto the beach. He was ordered by the city to post a bond to guarantee its removal

ship to discuss the possibility of canceling their lease with the city and entering into a new 35year agreement. McKinnon even went so far as to draw up a new lease agreement himself. The attempt to renegotiate the lease failed when the city expressed no interest in the proposal.

A petition initiative circulated around San Diego in 1971 forever changed the complexion of Sail Bay. The initiative sought to impose a 30foot height limit on buildings in the beach area, and its supporters gathered enough signatures to qualify it for the November 1972 ballot. The measure was approved by San Diego voters, but prior to its passage, developers scurried to get their building permits approved by the city for the construction of condominiums in excess of 30 feet on the shores of Sail Bay. There is today an almost uninterrupted wall of condos at the edge of the bay from Everts Street to the south end of Riviera Drive. The structures are so massive that motorists driving on nearby streets are often unaware they are within several yards of the bay. The structures are so imposing that many area residents refer to them as the "China Wall."

In 1974 Sixth District City Councilman Bob Martinet, whose district included the entire Mission Bay area, announced he would not seek re-election. Ten hopefuls ran for the seat. The June 1975 primary narrowed the field down to the two best-financed candidates, and two of the most conservative: Ray Lussa and Tom Gade.

Lussa had name recognition - two years earlier the young businessman had narrowly missed in an attempt to unseat incumbent councilman Floyd Morrow in another district. Gade, on the other hand, was an unknown making his first try for public office. Then 43 years old, Gade had begun a law practice three years earlier, after several years' employment as an engineer with the state

division of highways. His most notable community activities after living 14 years in the district were his involvement in Little League, the Mission Bay Youth Fields, and with the Boy Scouts and Eagle Scouts.

Another of the candidates in that race, Don Harman, objected to the campaign contributions Lussa and Gade were receiving from property owners living near Sail Bay. With the Sail Bay leases expiring in less than a year, Harman maintained the contributions could have some bearing on how either man might vote on the matter if

elected. Gade received more Sail Bay money than Lussa, prompting Harman to charge that the lawyer was accepting funds from Sail Bay interests with the understanding he would champion their cause if elected. Gade denied the charge, and Harman recently admitted, "I had nothing really to substantiate it." After the primary,

the general election. Between August and October of that year, Gade accepted donations totalMcKinnon, his campaign chairman, and his wife; \$500 from Bob Martinet; \$350 from Clinton McK-

innon; and \$250 from Vernon Taylor.

In November Gade won election to the city council. In the next four years he would leave no doubt that, for whatever reasons, his sentiments regarding Sail Bay coincided with those of the wealthy property owners whose land abutted it.

From April 1976 to November 1977 the city council would pass no fewer than 17 resolutions concerning Sail Bay. Gade himself would write one of the earliest of these, in which he assured all that after the expiration of the leases the beaches would "become the public property of all the people to be used for public park purpose from that date forward." And nine days after the expiration of the leases, the city council declared its intention to give high priority to the development of Sail Bay as a public beach. But largely through the efforts of Gade, the city council would in the next three years do everything in its power to delay development of the beach for public use.

On May 31, 1976, the tideland leases expired. In theory, the Sail Bay beach was now open for public use. Despite this, some nearby property owners



continued to post signs warning "No Trespassing" and "Private Beach." And to this day, nearly four years later, the Catamaran Hotel continues to exhort visitors, on its postcards and brochures, to "Relax on private, sundrenched beaches on the shores of

lovely Mission Bay." The beach adjacent to the Catamaran, like the rest of Sail Bay, is public beach.

Nine days after the leases expired, the city council ordered that 13 of the 28 piers built by Sail Bay property owners be removed within three

months. Two docks — at the Catamaran and the ZLAC Rowing Club were given permission to remain, contingent upon them being open to the public. The remaining structures were given a two-year extension before they, too, would have to

be demolished. Some of the property owners refused to apply for the necessary permit from the regional coastal commission to remove the piers, so the city was forced to do it for them. After months of haggling with both the regional and

state coastal commissions, the city finally received the necessary permits in May of 1977 to force the removal of the piers. The property owners were told they could remove the piers themselves, or the city would contract a firm to do the job and bill

them. Many of the property owners chose the latter course, a scenario that would repeat itself the following year when it came time for those persons given a two-year extension to remove theirs. Last March the city

whom the city had piers removed. Only 2 of them have reimbursed the city. The remaining 15 still owe the city fees totaling almost \$47,000. Sam Santillan of the city auditor's office savs some of the property owners who have refused to pay have

asked for a breakdown of the charges. But, he adds, "The vast majority just ignored the bill." Among those the city says owe money are J. Floyd Andrews, Clinton McKinnon, T. Claude Ryan, and George Millay. Spokesmen in the city attorney's

office say they don't know at this time if the city will file a lawsuit against the 15 individuals who have not paid the fees.

Although the forced removal of their private piers and docks was an inconvenience to them, Sail Bay residents faced

problems of a more serious nature shortly after the tideland leases expired. It was then that Assistant City Manager R.E. Graham issued a report to the city council listing beach encroachments of patios, landscaping, and other improvements to the homes and yards of property owners living on Sail Bay. Even though the once-legal encroachments were a matter of public record, few persons realized how extensive they were. While some were minor and didn't interfere with pub-

lic access to the beach, others were of such magnitude that they would require major revisions by some residents.

Among the latter are Martinet's patio, which extends some 20 feet southward onto public beach. To make it legal

would require the removal of about 2200 square feet of the patio, including concrete paving, wood decking, planter boxes, and other landscaping.

The former city councilman's brother, who lives one street away on West Briarfield, has an equally serious encroachment. Approximately 130 feet of Ronald Martinet's wooden seawall and about 3000 square feet of his patio are on public beach.

Across the street from Ronald Martinet is the home of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Bridge. Among their beach encroachments are 2400 square feet of lawn landscaping and other patio-type improvements. A portion of their roof overhang may also be in violation.

George Millay's condominium at 3726 Riviera Drive has beach encroachments that include about 90 feet of a 4-foot-high concreteblock wall with a 4-foothigh glass-and-metal windscreen that encloses a patio area.



The failure by property owners to remove private improvements on what is now public beach

raises an interesting question: Can the public use those improvements that lie on public land? "As long as the improvements are there, they [the property owners] don't have the exclusive right to use them," said Deputy City Attorney Hal Valderhaug. "The public can use them." Anticipating such a question when the leases expired, Valderhaug says he telephoned the San Diego Police Department



cost of the study was \$59,000. Several weeks later an ad hoc committee was established by the city council to work with the Reynolds Group on the project. The committee was composed of five Pacific Beach residents considered knowledgeable about Sail Bay, five abutting-property owners, and five citizens selected from the city at large in the hope they would provide a regional perspective to

the planning.

Through the first four months of 1977, Reynolds Group representatives and the ad hoc committee met several times to exchange ideas on how Sail Bay should be developed. The meetings were sometimes heated and emotional, with the Sail Bay residents repeatedly opposing plans to build a boardwalk on the beach. The city's consultant eventually presented

three plans for the development of Sail Bay. Called the basic, community, and regional concepts, they ranged in scope from minimal beach facilities and limited parking, to a sweeping proposal for many beach amenities and the construction of a large parking lot at the south end of the beach. The plans proposed widening the narrow beach in some areas and installing a pedestrianbicycle walkway that would connect the boardwalk on Bayside Lane with Crown Point. The plans also called for the boardwalk taking the form of a small bridge in the area around Briarfield Cove, where the Martinets live. This would be necessary because the beach is underwater there except at low tide. Still another provision was to establish a neighborhood park and parking spaces on a oneacre lot at the foot of Fanuel Street, purchased only a few months earlier by the city for \$605,000.



council's public facilities and recreation committee in October of 1977, a fourth alternative suggested by city staff had been added. Called the Roadway Plan, it called for a 40-foot-wide roadway to be built on the beach, which would have required extensive widening of the beach.

Several Sail Bay residents attended that committee meeting to protest the proposed inclusion of a bikeway. Gade suggested it be eliminated. Eve Smull, then president of the Pacific Beach Town Council, told the committee that her group had no recommendation to make regarding the four proposals but that it did favor the installation of a bicycle path. It should be noted, too, that an envi-

What they did not realize is that the town council's bylaws prevent such tactics by prohibiting members from voting until 30 days after joining. When that ploy failed, Vernon Taylor, whose numerous properties in the beach community include the office rented by the town council, announced he should be given two votes - one as a businessman and one as a resident of Pacific Beach. His suggestion was denied. Another vote on the bikeway was taken, and a majority again supported its construction. Of the individuals who became town councilmembers that night, "Very few ever came back," says longtime member Bern Swarts. The public facilities

ronmental quality report released a month prior to the meeting stated the pedestrian-bicycle path "is an integral part of any proposed development of Sail Bay and this concept is considered to be a positive contribution to this unique portion of Mission Bay Park."

But Sail Bay residents were determined to get the path deleted from the proposals. They packed the next meeting of the Pacific Beach Town Council in an attempt to force a change in the organization's position on the path. Many of those attending were not town councilmembers and proceeded to pay the five-dollar membership fee on the assumption that if they could call for another vote on the path, they would now have a majority opposing its construction.

and recreation committee discussed Sail Bay twice in October and finally sent it to the full city council with no recommendation. By this time a firth proposal had been added for consideration. Called the recommended plan, it was similar to the basic plan but provided more parking spaces, restrooms, and lifeguard stations and would have required the city to purchase another lot on Fanuel Street.



by the city council in 1970; by the Mission Beach Precise Plan, adopted by the city council in 1974; by the Mission Bay Land and Water Use, the park and recreation board, and the planning commission, in addition to meeting the coastal commission guidelines for Mission Bay adopted in 1977.

In an attempt to expedite the council hearing, Mayor Pete Wilson

set time limits for persons speaking in favor of each of the five proposals. Gade then asked that persons opposed to all the plans be given time to speak. As might be expected, Sail Bay residents were virtually the only persons in this category. Wilson granted them equal time — thirty minutes with proponents of the various plans.

One thing can be said of Gade at that November



city council meeting: he made it clear who he sided with. Shortly into the hearing, he moved for a continuance of the issue, arguing that a decision shouldn't be made on Sail Bay until the city council voted on a master plan for all of Mission Bay, a matter that wasn't scheduled to be aired for another three or four months. Dave Roberts, development division superintendent of the park and recreation department, assured the council that there would be no problem in first adopting a Sail Bay precise plan. But Gade persisted in his attempts to delay the matter, to the point where a woman in the audience finally approached the microphone and complained of him "stalling off," to which Mayor Wilson retorted, "He's had some help, ma'am." Gade then made a motion to continue Sail Bay to a later date, but it was defeated.

Next Dan McKinnon, Gade's former campaign chairman, asked that proponents of Sail Bay devel-

McKinnon claimed this arrangement would better represent the ratio of audience sentiment. Gade immediately made a motion to extend the opponents' time but could not even muster a second in the motion, and

it died. Each side still was permitted 30 minutes to speak.

One of the more popular arguments presented at the hearing by Sail Bay residents was that it would be foolish to approve a bikeway, restrooms, or parking facilities on Sail Bay because the public seldom used the beach there. That argument was, and is, true on the face of it. But as proponents of development are quick to point out, it is scarcely used because access to it is poor and there are no facilities such as restrooms on the beach.

As the hearing continued, Gade frequently interrupted to voice his

concerns about the proposals. Commenting on the proposed addition of a bikeway through Sail Bay, he said he was worried there might be massive congestion, as is the case on the Mission Beach boardwalk. "A 200-pound man on a 15-mile-perhour bicycle hitting a three-year-old kid coming out of one of those walks can be a hazard and I've seen it," he declared solemnly. The Sixth District councilman also said he was concerned about "the proliferation of mopeds" that he alleged were being ridden on bikeways elsewhere in the city.

The city council eliminated from consideration all but two of the proposed plans — the basic and the more expensive recommended plans. A motion was made to approve the recommended plan, but before it could be voted on, Gade proposed some amendments to it. They were to delete the parking provision beneath the bluffs at Moorland Drive and thus eliminate almost all parking; and to delete the bicycle-pedestrian path, which would reduce access to the area. The amendments died, and when the city council voted on the recommended plan, it was defeated five to four. Councilman Jess

seconded Gade's amendment, prompting Councilman Floyd Morrow to comment, "If you want to preclude people from the public from having their public beach, then go ahead, but I don't want to be any part of it." Neither did his colleagues — the

Company parking lot."

Haro then made a motion, seconded by Councilwoman Maureen O'Connor, that the basic plan be adopted. Again Gade went to work. Again he proposed an amendment that would eliminate the parking spaces near Moorland Drive. Councilman Lee Hubbard Gade amendment was defeated.

Next, Mac Strobi appointed to fill the vacancy created by the election of Jim Ellis to the state assembly, made a motion to direct city staff to implement a walkway that would be a pedestrian-oriented path, ban-

But even with a diluted version of the plan calling for the least development of the five presented, Gade was not satisfied. Again, to the applause of Sail Bay residents, he unsuccessfully argued for a continuance. The city council then voted approval of the basic plan concept ---minus bicycles — with only Gade voting against it. City staff was directed to return with specific plans for implementing the project. Proponents of public access to Sail Bay left the council chambers believing the city would be improving the beach and providing easier entrance - however minimal — in the near future. But Tom Gade was not through trying to quash the project.

Those who favored the development of Sail Bay had reason for optimism in 1978. More than a million dollars from the capital improvement program for the fiscal years

1978 to 1983 were earmarked for construction of Sail Bay improvements, with 1983 the scheduled start date. (Capital improvement programs are funded in six-year increments, with the city council every year adding or dropping projects, or changing their priorities.) Also in 1978, the Reynolds Environmental Group and city staff submitted the final master plan for Sail Bay — the basic plan

concept with a pedestrian-only walkway around the beach. Estimated cost for construction of the entire plan was almost \$1.5 million; the walkway and additional sand alone came to \$800,000. Another environmental quality report concluded the master plan would have "no significant impact on the environment," and the park and recreation board approved the plan. Devel-



opment of Sail Bay appeared a certainty.

In 1979 the design plan for Sail Bay had only to be presented to and approved by the city council's public facilities and recreation committee — Gade was one of five councilmen on the committee — and the full city council to ensure its success. But the plan ---discussed ad nauseam in the past — was on the committee's agenda no fewer than seven times in the first seven months and never did receive a hearing before the full city council. This was accomplished by postponing discussion several times on the flimsiest of pretenses. On one such occasion, Gade received a phone call from Pacific Beach Town Council President Eve Smull saying she would be late to the hearing and promptly continued the issue to a later date. Not only was Smull's presence not crucial to the hearing, but the matter could have been trailed to a later time in the hearing (Smull did appear later) had Gade chosen to.


Perhaps the councilman's most obvious attempt to delay the project occurred in April 1979. At that time he sent a letter to beach-area community groups asking them to indicate which project - the redevelopment of Ocean Boulevard as a pedestrian area, or the improvements to Sail Bay - would they prefer to see city funds spent on, based on the assumption that only one of the projects could obtain capital improvement program

funds in the next six-year period. Park Development Superintendent Jim Gutzmer fired off a letter of his own, asking the community groups for their input to the Gade letter. Apparently the only group to reply was the Pacific Beach Town council districts are not limited to a given number of capital improvement projects. Says Gade's successor as Sixth District city councilman, Mike Gotch, "I think he felt he could transfer the pressure off Sail Bay." "Don't let anyone tell

Council, which, in a scathing letter, said it "emphatically rejects Councilman Gade's assumption that only one of the two improvements can be funded during the next six-year CIP." City you that one has to go and the other has to fail. I don't believe that at all." What Gade did not mention in his letter is that the Ocean Boulevard project may qualify for state and federal funds, or





that those improvements could be financed by creating an assessment district. Despite the Pacific Beach Town Council's emphatic plea for retention of the Sail Bay project, one month later Gade sent a memo to the city manager's office in which he said he intended to push for a capital improvement program to be called "Ocean Boulevard Improvements." Gade wrote that the new project might be awarded a higher funding priority than the Sail Bay plan. "In light of this," he wrote, "is there any specific reason why the Sail Bay master plan should not be deferred until the Ocean Boulevard project is ready for council consideration?" Deputy City Manager Sue Williams replied that the project could indeed be deferred but warned, "There would still be community expectation about the project's accomplishment." Williams added that by

deferring the Sail Bay project, "The issue of the private encroachments will not have been addressed."

The public facilities and recreation committee never did make a decision about Sail Bay last year, nor did they send it on to the full council for a vote. Today the master plan for its development, despite hundreds of hours of work devoted to it by the Reynolds Environmental Group, is still in limbo.

Opinion differs as to how Gade obtained the support of, and in the opinion of many, became the obedient servant of the Sail Bay interests. "They [Sail Bay lessees] picked him," area resident Barbara Shafer stated matter-of-factly. "He hadn't been active in the community. He had no connection with beach politics or San Diego politics," said Shafer, whose husband, Phil, was an administrative assistant to former city councilman





Floyd Morrow, and an aspirant for the council seat won by Gade. Shafer resigned to the delays in the Sail Bay project. "He [Gade] didn't do anything illegal," she sighed. "He just did what he was put in there to do. That's the way politics is."

But others, including some of Gade's detractors, believe Gade's decision to run for office was his own, and that it was only after he did so that he sought the support of the Sail Bay people. Clinton McKinnon scoffs at the notion that he and some of his neighbors had undue influence with Gade because of their campaign contributions to him. "I don't think Mr. Gade can be influenced by any contributions to his campaign," he said recently. "I would be very disappointed if a city councilman could be influenced by a \$200 contribution."

Gade himself says allegations that he voted against Sail Bay development as a concession to his backers living in the area are "absolutely and

unequivocally false." He reiterated his previously stated objections to the project, including the undesirability of installing a parking lot on the beach below Moorland and Riviera Drives. "The question becomes: Do we want to pave over the beach?" he said. "If so, we can let them sunbathe at the May Company parking lot." The former councilman said he disagrees that the beach at Sail Bay is still virtually a private one. "That is an absolute public beach," he asserted. "The reason nobody uses

it is that nobody can find a parking place down there." Yet, he finds no inconsistency in his opposition to the Moorland Drive parking lot. "It's simply a matter of choice, not restraint" that the public doesn't use the beach, he said. "With limited use and great cost, we could much better use those dollars, on Ocean Boulevard. There has been no evidence I've seen that would alter my point of view."

Today the future of Sail Bay would seem to be in the hands of the man

The 32-year-old newcomer to City Hall says he does not believe the Ocean Boulevard project or development of Fiesta Island should have a higher priority than Sail Bay, as has been suggested by some persons. And he believes he can persuade his colleagues to include both Sail Bay and Ocean Boulevard its capital improvement projects. Besides a recalcitrant city council, there is one other potential obstacle to Sail Bay development. The Martinet brothers have hired a lawyer, Larry Marshall, to assist them in fighting the removal of their encroachments. Neither Marshall nor Deputy City Attorney Hal Valderhaug will speculate how long legal maneuvering may take, but Marshall says some of the other Sail Bay lessees also have indicated an interest in retaining legal counsel. "The public servants in the name of the public feel compelled to do private injury in the name of the public," Marshall said. "What



The issue of encroachments is expected to stir again soon. 



gested that in ten other cases the city grant a temporary permit to the property owners, which would be valid until the beach is developed, and in six others, grant the permit but require partial removal of the encroachment.

Gutzmer and Valderhaug were instructed to begin negotiations with the property owners to work out details of the encroachment program. Those negotiations are scheduled to commence any day now. Gutzmer estimates they will take three months to complete. Then he will report back to the public facilities and recreation committee and eventually to the full council for its approval.

One park and recreation department staffer estimates that even with city council approval and the necessary financing, it would take as long as two vears to develop working plans, obtain appropriate permits from the coastal commission and the Army Corps of Engineers, placate the state fish and game department, and complete construction of the Sail Bay master plan. With a current projected start date in 1983, that would mean another five years before beach improvements become a reality.

Possibly delaying the project even further is the Jarvis II initiative (called Jaws II by many city officials and journalists), which will appear on the June ballot and which would reduce state income taxes. Most of Sail Bay is slated to be financed with capital outlay funds. Predicts one city official, "If Jaws II passes, capital outlay funds will practically dry up and disappear." If that happens, it's anybody's guess what will become of Sail Bay development plans. For the immediate future at least, Sail Bay will remain, in the words of the consultant who developed the master plan, "the ocean back yard of numerous separate property owners exactly what it has been for 50 years." ■



Error Plague

As elected committee members of the Republican Party of San Diego County we feel it is imperative to set the record straight on Scott Barnett's self-described "Irresponsible Gossip" story, which we found to be errorplagued and misleading ("Ludicrous and Irresponsible Gossip," "City Lights," July 28).

It may be helpful for readers to understand that Mr. Barnett's recent actions suggest that he has an agenda flatly opposed to the ideals and principles of the Republican Party — most vividly illustrated by his Republicans AGAINST the Recall initiative in 2003.

We find it difficult to understand why Mr. Barnett, ostensibly a Republican, would try to save a failed, tax-raising Democrat governor and deny California the needed reforms that Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger is now courageously putting forth.

In any case, Mr. Barnett's article is riddled with factual errors. And when he's not wrong on the facts, he leaves out critical facts in an apparent attempt to slant a story for shock value.

Pointing out all the faults in Mr. Barnett's "reporting" would take more space than you allocate for a letter to the editor, but here are a few:

(1) Mr. Barnett notes with great fanfare that the Republican Party paid fund-raising commissions to a Democrat. That is true. What Mr. Barnett failed to note, however, is the significant fact that Mr. Ray Drew was the fund-raiser for partyendorsed candidate Dick Murphy and legally helped the party raise funds while the party was helping his candidate. From our standpoint, we much prefer Democrat fund-raising professionals raising money into our coffers than those of Democrats. Anytime a Democrat wants to help our team instead of their team, we welcome it.

Mr. Barnett also fails to disclose his own well-known, longstanding rivalry with former Murphy chief of staff John Kern. Shouldn't such glaring conflicts of interest be disclosed?

(2) Mr. Barnett quotes another unnamed source claiming an artificially low quorum level was imposed during the meeting where Steve Francis was endorsed. Neither the chairman nor the full body has the power to alter the standard for a quorum during any meeting. As an aside, the meeting in question had one of the highest attendance records in recent time.

(3) Mr. Barnett again quotes yet another unnamed source claiming the chairman announced two votes would take place under the endorsement procedure but that more than two votes took place. That is true, but once again, Mr. Barnett's reporting tells only a small fraction of the story. Left glaringly absent from his "reporting," however, was that a motion to reconsider took place and thus required the taking of two additional votes. The chairman does not have the power, or the option, to ignore a motion to reconsider. If he had ignored the motion to reconsider, he would have been tampering with the process. He did not. The chairman acted in an absolutely fair manner consistent with Robert's Rules of Order at all times.

(4) Contrary to Mr. Barnett's odd characterizations, the Republican Party is a focused campaign organization consisting of thousands of volunteers and donors, supported by a very small staff. The volunteer time and dollars contributed to the party all serve to aggressively support the values we hold dear as Republicans.

The saddest aspect of Mr. Barnett's article was the little regard he gives to the volunteers, including the volunteer leadership, who give their time and effort to the Republican Party and its candidates.

Gangbanger's Dictionary Lecture

got more power doing the right thing than I ever had being an actual violent gang member," says Derek Grover, author of *The Gangbanger's Dictionary: One Hundred and Eighty-Seven Things You Better Know Before You Join a Gang.* Grover will be giving a lecture and signing his book at the San Diego Public Library in Mira Mesa on Saturday, September 3.

Calendar Local events

For a quarter of a century Grover went by the name D-Man and was the leader of the



Bloccide Crip Gang in Southeast San Diego. With his book he hopes to educate the public. Grover instructs kids

how to answer a simple question like "Where are you from?"

"Your answer could get you killed," he writes. "The best way to answer this is to just stand there and look at his hands. Let God talk for you. To say anything else is a form of disrespect to the [gang]banger." Grover explains, "There's a lot of killings

on holidays because on holidays a gangster plans rival attacks. All holidays are like that except Christmas Day. Gangsters are extremely spiritual people because they die young. When you go to jail, you believe in God one hundred percent." Grover has been to jail around 40 times in the past 27 years for gang-related crimes. "I was sitting in San Quentin and God came to me and said, 'I'm gonna show you some things, and I want you to write this book.' He wasn't coming and telling me in a soft, squeaky voice or a loud voice, He was telling me in my own voice because it's my own voice that I trust. But I knew it was God talking to me because it was thoughts that I couldn't control; it was something more powerful than me.

When he was at the top of his game

Grover was a millionaire. "I got those millions of dollars from robbing and stealing and taking," he says. "Fighting gang wars is extremely expensive; it costs hundreds of thousands of dollars a year because you have to pay your gang members. If you don't pay people then nobody comes to you with information. The more money you got the more the streets talk to you. The streets tell you what's going on."

In *Gangbanger's Dictionary*, Grover defines several street terms, a few of which he reads aloud: "'Busted on' means to shoot a full clip. A 'gat,' that's a gun that's fired no matter what. A gun is used by law enforcement, [and] a gat is used by a violent criminal. When somebody says 'gat,' he's saying he's shot [the gun]. A "strap" is a fake gun, and as any

A "strap" is a fake gun, and as any stoner can tell you, a "blunt" is a "cigar from which tobacco is removed and replaced with marijuana" that is resealed and smoked. A "homeboy" is a well-connected friend, and a "homie" is a person who is not well known.

'The reason I wanted to write this book [is because] one of my homeboys was killed in a fiery shootout in 1997. My gang robbed the Saks Fifth Avenue in Mission Valley for two million dollars in diamonds." A week after the robbery police officers caught up with Grover's homeboy, Bobby Lewis Kirk, Jr., while he was at home. "[Bobby] just sprayed 'em up a hundred times with an AK 47. They shot back and burned the house down on top of him," says Grover. "I couldn't take his death like it was just another day. I wanted to dedicate my life to righteousness after his death." Bobby is one of four people Grover lists in his book under the words, "This book is dedicated to the homeboys of the Bloccide Crip Gang. Your loyalty to the gang will never be forgotten.'

In his gangbanging days Grover

regarded police officers the same way he did the Bloods, his rival gang. "The police are gangsters, too. It don't seem like it, but only a gangster can bring down a gangster. If you was a cop and you didn't do nothing bad, vou wouldn't catch nobody. You have to use deadly force against some gangsters in order to disarm

them. That's how it goes in the world of gangbanging."

How do his old homeboys feel about the D-Man's new book? "Gang members don't kill people that preaches peace 'cause all gang members are looking for peace. They just need somebody who knows their language to talk to them."

past several weeks. This weather pattern, more or less typical for late summer, may continue through mid-September. The extra rainfall has contributed to the greening of certain kinds of vegetation. On the desert floor, for example, the spidery ocotillo can grow an instant crop of green leaves after a storm, only to drop them two to three weeks later if no further rain arrives. The distribution of green-leaved ocotillos tells not only where rain has recently fallen; it also indicates where the runoff has collected and remained for enough time to be absorbed by the ocotillo's root system.

The Chaparral, the tangled assortment of low-growing, drought-resistant, native shrubs covering most of San Diego County's lower mountain slopes, has managed to remain fairly attractive this summer. Unlike many

of the scrubby natives near the coast, chaparral plants tend to hang on to their leaves year round. This month, the coppery, sun-bur-nished remnants of last spring's flower clusters are still clinging to the tips of buckwheat and chamise plants, and a few wildflowers have popped up here and there in response to recent thunderstorm activity over the higher mountains. To enjoy the beauty of the chaparral landscape, explore the hillsides above Lake Morena and along Lyons Valley and Japatul Roads in East County. Or head inland from Poway or Escondido toward Ramona or Valley Center and beyond.



As one of the richest wetland areas Southern California, the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary offers an uncommon opportunity to come in contact with a natural ecosystem seemingly plunked down in the midst of Orange County's airport/urban district. Amid willows, cattails, and tules, you can spy on ducks, geese, and shore-

birds, listen to bullfrog choruses, and perhaps even spot pond turtles sunning themselves on protruding limbs. You can thrill to the graceful antics of herons and egrets, and the soaring flights of marsh hawks. Make no mistake, the entire 300-acre spread, in its present incarnation, is

Make no mistake, the entire 300-acre spread, in its present incarnation, is essentially an urban park, planted densely with native trees and shrubs and irrigated with water from holding ponds that are part of a state-of-the-art wastewater treatment plant. Starting in the 1990s, the Irvine Ranch Water District, with the support of the Irvine Company and the Sea and Sage chapter of the Audubon Society, began an ambitious project to transform the once-neglected and raw-looking property into a naturalistic landscape typical of Orange County's original lowland and upland habitats. That effort has resulted in a tightly nested, ten-mile system of wide, smooth, wheelchair-accessible trails, restrooms and resting benches galore, and most importantly a first-class habitat for birds.

Audubon volunteers have installed dozens of nestboxes throughout the sanctuary to attract cavity-nesting birds, and they conduct a monthly bird census which has resulted in sightings of nearly 300 species of birds to date.

A good way to enter the sanctuary is to park along the roadway known as Riparian View, south of Michelson Drive in Irvine. There are two parking lots/trailheads here, open dawn to dusk, plus a one-page trail map that you can take with you. The map details several signed routes pieced together out of the bewildering maze of wide trails and levee-top roads that reach every comer of the sanctuary.

The southern of the two trailheads marks the beginning of the 0.8-milelong Tree Hill Trail, perhaps the best route for getting an overview of what the place has to offer. On it, you first visit Tree Hill, where African acacias and other exotic trees dot the top of a small knoll — a landscape demonstration project begun by the water district on Earth Day 1990. You then descend past planted pines, sycamores, and cottonwoods, and through a meticulously tended facsimile of sage-scrub and chaparral habitat. Curling around the perimeter of the water-treatment plant, you find yourself on the levee of one of the several rectangular ponds, which are actually settling basins.





Garbage Land: On the Secret Trail of Trash



By Elizabeth Rovte Little, Brown and Company, 2005; 311 pages; \$24.95

FROM THE DUST JACKET:

Into our trash cans go dead batteries, dirty diapers, bygone burritos, broken toys, tattered socks, eight-track cassettes. scratched CDs, banana peels..., But where do these things go next? In a country that consumes and then casts off more and more, what actually happens to the things we throw away?

In Garbage Land, science writer Elizabeth Royte leads us on the wild adventure that begins once our trash

hits the bottom of the can. Along the way, we meet an odor chemist who explains why trash smells so bad; garbage fairies and recycling gurus; neighbors of massive waste dumps; CEOs making fortunes by encouraging waste or encouraging recycling - often both at the same time; scientists trying to revive our most polluted places; fertilizer fanatics and adventurers who kayak amid sewage; paper people, steel people, aluminum people, plastic people, and even a guy who swears by recycling human waste.

With a wink and a nod and a tightly clasped nose, Royte takes us on a bizarre cultural tour through slime, stench, and heat - in other words, through the back end of our ever more super-sized lifestyles. By showing us what happens to the things we've "disposed of," Royte reminds us that our decisions about consumption and waste have a very real impact – and that unless we undertake radical change, the garbage we create will always be with us: in the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the food we consume.

WHAT THE CRITICS SAY:

From Publishers Weekly: Where does it all go? Most of us are content to shrug off the details [of our garbage] - as long as it's out of sight (and smell). Not so journalist Royte, whose book in some ways (including its title) echoes Fast Food Nation. That McDonald's is more immediately engaging a subject doesn't make, say, the massive, defunct Fresh Kills landfill on Staten

Island, N.Y., any less compelling. Royte nicely balances autobiographical elements (where does her Fig Newtons carton end up, anyway?), interviews and fieldwork with more technical research.

From Booklist: A visit to the filthy Gowanus Canal near her Brooklyn home got Royte thinking about garbage. What exactly does her family throw out each day? Who carries it away, where is it taken, how is it processed? To find out, she catalogs her daily household garbage and tracks her trash to garbage transit stations, landfills, and recycling plants. Royte's nervy and unprecedented journey through the land of garbage is fascinating, appalling, and ... downright entertaining What her staggering exposé tells us is that as the quantity, variety, and toxicity of our garbage increases, we must, like nature, evolve ways to reclaim and reuse everything we make.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Elizabeth Royte has written for the New York Times Maaazine. Harper's, National Geographic, Outside, Smithsonian, and The New Yorker. She was the recipient of an Alicia Patterson Foundation fellowship in 1999. She lives in Brooklyn.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR:

Elizabeth Royte was born in Boston in 1960. On the morning we talked, she told me, "I grew up outside Boston and went to Bard College and took a B.A. in literature. and then I moved to New York and started working at magazines. I've been a serious magazine writer since about 1985. I finally got around to writing my first book, The Tapir's Morning Bath: Solving the Mysteries of the Tropical Rain Forest, in 2001."

To my remark that I liked the title, Ms. Royte said, "It's a little hard for people to relate to. I didn't come up with that, my editor did. And I'm not sure it was a great idea to go with that.

People don't know how to say tapir or they don't know what it is. Once you read the book it makes a little bit of sense what the title is, but it's mysterious until you get to that part of the book, but anyway." "Did your parents read?"

"Well, The New Yorker was-

n't in the house growing up. My father is a psychologist, and I don't think they were fiction readers. We used the library a lot. Reading was encouraged. I read a great deal of the time, and we learned to read very early. And my mom, she was always reading early childhood education stuff. She was a teacher. So they weren't reading great literature. I mean, we had great literature around the house, but I don't remember my mom sitting around reading Hemingway or anything like that."

"When did you decide that you wanted to write?"

"When I came to New York, I worked at magazines and thought that I wanted to be an editor. And

I worked at The Nation and learned the important skills of copy editing and fact checking. And then when I worked at Conde Nast, as an editorial assistant, and then moved to another magazine and was actually assigning and editing stories as a junior editor and when the magazine folded, my boyfriend, who's now my husband - he's a freelance writer – urged me not to try and find another job but to try to be freelance. I started book reviews, just sort of for fun, and it didn't pay very well, as you know, but I started doing them. I also kept looking for an editing job. But people offered me writing jobs instead. So that launched my freelance career. I haven't really had a job since then. So I never really consciously said, 'I want to be a writer.'

"I tried writing fiction in college, and I was terrible at it. Now, though, I'm so wedded to nonfiction I don't think that I could really make anything up. I don't have that much imagination. Like most writers, I have a lot of curiosity about the natural world. This book about garbage was a complete departure for me. I'm used to writing about science and the environ-

ples of the historical progression of auto technology from 1886-1915, with "some classics and a concept car."

"They sure weren't."

"But this book started just with my curiosity about where stuff went. I think everyone has that curiosity, but maybe it's because people were so unwilling to help me that it got my hackles up. I'm a curious person and a stubborn person. The more they said 'no,' the more I had to keep pushing to find out where everything was going."

The Sunday New York Times wrote, about Garbage Land, "Imagine a type of obsessive-compulsive disorder that leaves you unable to throw or flush something away without tracking precisely where it goes. Not just from your indoor container to the curb or trunk line; this affliction makes you unable to put your mind at rest unless you follow your castoff into the

I'm not a person who fretted about landfills filling up. I had a lot of other environmental concerns, but garbage and recycling was not one of them. I'm still not obsessed with garbage, but I do obsessed with garbage, but I do think things could be a lot different and a lot better.

"I was interested because no one could tell me at first. So it got even more mysterious. Like, people would give you a partial answer and that just made me mad. You know, they'd say, 'Oh, we recycle it.' And you'd say, 'Well, what is it recycled into, and where is it done?' No one had the whole picture because the waste business is so segmented, and it's in public hands,

"How did you get interested in garbage?"

"It started because I was actively looking for a book subject, and, as I said, I usually write about plants and the environment, but I used to travel a lot to report those stories. And now that I had Lucy, our three-year-old, I didn't want to go away.

"So I had to do something in New York. I was going around to universities and talks and readings and talking to scientists. I met a woman at Columbia University who was studying the city's coffee footprint, and I was intrigued by the sound of that. What is a coffee footprint?

"Well, she was figuring out how much land and water it took to grow the beans that came to New York and turned into our coffee. And also how much paper and water and trees and energy and water it took to make the cups that we drink the coffee in.

"So I got interested in the idea of an ecological footprint and realized that it also includes the surface area it takes to assimilate waste. This was the germ of my idea, that the city had a garbage foot-

"People have such distaste for garbage, or for offal. I think that behind this distaste dwells our fear of death and disintegration." Ms. Royte did not disagree.

In her chapter rather ominously titled "Dark Angels of Detritus," she quotes from a 1993 essay by Italo Calvino. In this essay, Calvino wrote about his daily transfer of trash from the kitchen to a street-side container. "Through this daily gesture I confirm the need to separate myself from a part of what was once mine, the slough of chrysalis or squeezed lemon of living, so that its substance might remain, so that tomorrow I can identify completely [without residues] with what I am and have."

"I thought," said Ms. Royte, "about the death of the things that we confined to the landfills. And there's a sadness to it, seeing these things laying there. When I went to Barren Island and saw all these leather shoes that had been worn in the '20s and the '30s, it made me sadder than seeing anything else, and I'm not exactly sure why. You can see that these shoes and boots were worn nearly to death. The people whose shoes were lying around Barren Island, maybe their wearers had long and healthy lives, but it's just sad somehow to see these twisted little shoes. You know, men's shoes, women's shoes, babies' shoes, lying there with the water lapping at them. It just makes you think about what a short time we're here for and what a mess we're leaving behind. And how long this stuff is going to linger.

"What will linger the longest?"

"Glass. Because it's heavy to transport, and the stuff that goes into making it, silica and sand, are abundant. There's not a lot of motivation to keep the stuff cycling. Although it saves a lot of energy to make new glass from old glass. You don't have to heat it up nearly as much. So it is an energy saver. (continued on page 104)

"Recycling on its own, in terms of recycling that I did, reduced my garbage input quite a bit and got me well below the national average. I think recycling is good and important, but it's not going to mean that much unless manufacturers and designers start thinking about designing things to be

no. Royce whes about the problems that electronic waste causes. This waste, she said, "is growing at a faster rate than any other fraction of the waste produced by people like you and me. We have computers that don't work anymore or are too slow or can't be upgraded to do what we want, and they contain a lot of heavy metals and other hazardous materials. And in a landfill these things reach into the groundwater, if landfills leak, and when they're burnt they emit toxins.

"Some people try to do the right thing, and they go to these community drop-offs at landfills.



When the concert was canceled, Ticketmaster refunded the cost of the ticket but not all fees, which included an \$8.60 per-ticket service charge and a \$3.35 per-order fee. Ticketmaster kept the per-order fee.

"It pretty much is the industry standard," says Lisa Langley of Virginia-based Music Today, which sold tickets for this year's Street Scene. If Street Scene had been canceled, Langley says the \$7 per-ticket fee would not have been refunded.

"We don't play those kind of games," says Len Paul, owner of Soma and Soma's in-house ticket company Lunaticks. "When Sum 41 and Kottonmouth Kings canceled [in June], we refunded everything.'

"We return everything," says Elaine, a Ticket Web customer service employee. Ticket Web is a San Francisco-based company that handles tickets for L.A.



One Kool-Aid, Please "This happens every night, guitarist Ricky Rene Maymi said while sneaking a smoke inside the Casbah on August 17. Anton Newcombe, the mercurial vocalist behind the BJM had canceled two dates due to Newcombe's throat ailments. He seemed mellow as he entered the Casbah. Maybe he feared using his raspy voice to sing, because he spent 10 to 20 minutes between each song tuning his guitar and berating his guitar techs and the opening band (which featured a former BJM member). Great Wall? John Renna, owner/operator of the Coaster Saloon in Mission Beach, recently began hosting live bands outdoors on Friday and Saturday.

Attorney James Pyle says he owns apartments behind the Coaster Saloon. "I received some complaint calls from tenants," says Pyle. "They say it sounds like drums are in their bedrooms. Police have been called on a number of occasions."

Renna says, "I anticipated this, that's why we built a sound wall. It just went up last week." The wall, 30 feet wide and 20 feet tall, is made of wood and filled with foam insulation. "We ordered a sound meter to make sure we weren't in excess of 55 [decibels].... We'll go another 10 feet higher if we have to.' Renna says police have shown up, "but there have been no citations. They have to have evidence that we violated the law, and they have no proof.' Pyle says there is no

Wit. Iraq. "A lot of rappers, they talk about guns, their gangs, and being in the street and how they feel like they need [a gun]," says founding member Novz, a

Marine corporal. "We've done search-and-destroy missions, ambush patrols, and things like that All of us have combat-action ribbons. I have two myself, but as far as guns go, we're about saving lives, not taking them.'

SouthuNoyz recently released The Mason Dixon Movement, a seven-song CD. It opens with noise from a battle zone before jumping into laid-back raps with a Southern drawl. (The soldiers are from Texas, Georgia, Mississippi, and Louisiana.) Noyz and 3 Thirds, a

sergeant, met at Camp Pendleton and started SouthuNoyz before their first deployment in 2003. They put the group on hold when they were both sent to Iraq for their second tour. After they returned at the end of 2004, they added Yung Sip, a corporal, and 7.K., a lance corporal.





ho knew the original singer for Dream Theater had been living in an apartment on Spring Street since May 2003? "I chose La Mesa because it really is a nice place to live and I knew the area well," says 53-year-old Charlie Dominici (who also

resided in San Diego from 1998 to 2000). "It's very rustic and kind of like an old classic western." Dominici joined the now-famed prog

rockers in November 1987, co-writing seven of the eight songs on Dream Theater's debut album *When Dream and Day Unite.* He was booted in 1989 and replaced by Kevin James LaBrie, reportedly because of "personality conflicts," and spent the next 15 years as a "virtual recluse" (his description). "I needed to get some financial stability and also wanted to return to music only when it felt good again."

Dominici didn't completely disappear — he sang at Dream Theater drummer Mike Portnoy's wedding in 1994 and joined his old band onstage in L.A. for two songs in March 2004 (filmed for the DVD *When Dream and Day Reunite*). "I was so out of practice, vocally...after that I realized how much I had been like a fish out of water since I had not been doing much musically. I quit the car business and started writing."

The singer (who has learned guitar) just released the first in a series of three acoustic solo CDs comprising one long concept trilogy called 03. "The CD is like a movie made out of music," he says. Dominici is coy about the project's theme, saying only the CDs are about "modern times, current events, and the possible end of the world." **FAVORITE CONCEPT ALBUMS?**

1. Queensryche, *Operation Mindcrime* ("Interesting story. Great progressive

Everything I know about Charlie Patton I read in a comic book by R. Crumb. Patton was an early-1900s Delta bluesman. Crumb is an eccentric underground artist. It was Crumb's cartooning that first introduced me to the genre. I was a big Crumb fan: if he thought country blues was important, then so be it. He caricatured the Delta in jagged, high-contrast strokes of shadow and light, each image giving off shock waves. He wrote, "[Patton] was a rambler, a shiftless no-good who lived off women and passed his time in total idleness." Perfect!

But Charlie Patton had a profound effect on blues and rock. Historians say Patton earned side money teaching his novel technique to students, including

Heavy Price

"June suns, you cannot store them To warm the winter's cold."

n his 1982 drama, Tom Stoppard swore that love is "the real thing." He's become less certain since: "Is love ever the real thing?" he asked an interviewer five years ago. "And if so, should you act on it?"


In a heartbeat. Why? Because, he says, "Love is an abstraction. It's never real the way a coffee cup is real." Oscar Wilde develops the

point in Stoppard's Invention of Love: "Before Plato could describe love, the loved one had to be invented" - a myth created about the person instead of mere biographical facts. We fall in love with our creation, Wilde claims, not the human being. "We would never love anybody if we could see past our invention."

In the early 1890s, Wilde loved Alfred Douglas, who was "spoiled, vindictive, utterly selfish, and not very talented, but these are merely the facts." To Wilde, Douglas was "ivory and gold" and beloved of Apollo. Wilde believed that not just love, but art and truth are works of the imagination. He went a step further: he invented himself. He "took charge" of his own myth, lived it, and paid a heavy price for his "nameless, luckless" attraction to Douglas.

(A typical Stoppard turnabout: he has members of the media claim they "invented" Oscar Wilde and floated him like a kite. "But he got away from us.")

A.E. Housman was in love with Oxford class-

MITH takes place in Housman's mind. He's recently deceased, the condition he wrote about in almost every poem:

> June suns, you cannot store them To warm the winter's cold, The lad that hopes for heaven Shall fill his mouth with mould."

On the bank of the river Styx, glad his life is over, Housman awaits Charon to ferry his spirit to the Elysian Fields and reflects on choices made and roads not taken.

Housman published A Shropshire Lad in 1896. At that time there was no word for his love of Jackson, which gets veiled allusions in several poems. As a result of Wilde's three Criminal Law Amendment Bill trials for "gross indecency," in the mid-1890s, a group of British males coined the term "homosexual" in 1897. The word became a defining invention. "We aren't anything till there's a word for it," says Chamberlain in the play.

Housman's scholarly reaction to the coinage is telling. Rather than finding his identity in the word, he objects: the roots are half Latin and half Greek. The analytical trumps the intuitive.

Invention of Love combines facts and myths. Some scenes, like Housman's days as an idealistic Oxford student, come from his life; others, like his meeting with Wilde, never happened. The most moving of the latter: Housman's shade meets his younger self, who doesn't recognize him (young Housman says he's writing "speakable" poems; older AEH replies, "Mine were quite unspeakable"). When young Housman says he doesn't know what love is, his older self quotes a fragment from Sophocles: love is like ice held in the hands; it hurts to hold and, because it sticks, hurts to let go.

Ah, Stoppard! If you followed every lead in his *Arcadia*, from the history of British gardens to Newtonian physics to Chaos Theory, you'd get a decent college education. Do the same with *The Invention of Love* and you'd earn a master's or Ph.D. (more than any of his other works, in fact, Stoppard struts recondite erudition in *Invention*).

The Cygnet Theatre's opening night suggested that you'd need an advanced degree to appreciate the play — and thus raced through scenes without looking back. Instead of savoring Stoppard's rich language, the production favored intrusive background sounds; thick, garbled accents (at least half the cast); and sprints through speeches. The evening felt like something to get through, rather than enjoy.

Invention opened two weeks ago. Cygnet's gifted director Sean Murray's probably fixed many of these problems by now. One, however, looked ingrained. The play has a gallery of famous 19th-century characters: the moral art critic John Ruskin, Plato's translator Benjamin Jowett, the champion of the Renaissance Walter Pater, and Oxford dons. Most (Tom Stephenson's wistful Pater and Dennis Scott's gently presentational Chamberlain being exceptions) got played as if they loved to hear themselves talk. But they didn't. They loved to hear, and compose, sentences as sculpted as the art they adored.

They even vied with each other, giving verbal gamesmanship the status of an Olympic event. Elegant prose was their invention of love. It implied a sober, orderly universe that most of them, in private, acknowledged was anything but.

Invention is one of Stoppard's more obscure plays. It's also his most fluid, even literally. Dreamlike scenes toy with time and space: the River Styx suddenly flows into the Isis River at Oxford; the living converse with the dead. Cygnet's design work enhances this fluidity with a spare set, a revolve (on which Tim West, as a hooded, crusty Charon, ferries souls to Hades), and excellent slide projections - clouds, paintings, Latin verbs - that function like visual footnotes. Shulamit Nelson's precise costumes range from appropriate running shoes to ubiquitous Edwardian tweed.

Jim Chovick struck moving, elegaic tones as the older AEH, though his raspy accent needed toning down. Sean Cox, as Housman the lad, gave a deft blend of optimism and sexual perplexity. Stoppard said he advocated a balanced life in his portrait of Housman: of achievements as well as losses. If so, he shouldn't have given Oscar Wilde such a memorable last speech, which reframes Housman as an evader of life and which Daren Scott performs with such disarming élan it's easy to forget that, whether it be real or just invention, in the end both Housman and Wilde

were fools for love.

sorcery, according to St. Paul) Antipholus of Syracuse and Antipholus of Ephesus share the same identity but are opposites. Complications ensue. In some ways, the frame of this staging's more arresting than the middle. The 90-minute version moves well, but on opening night the acting was technical, not felt. You could sense that performances would grow, however. Plus, having Charles Janasz (as bedraggled Egeon) and Kandis Chappell (the Lady Abbess as a force of nature) guarantees quality. As do Liam Craig and Evan Zes as the dual Dromios: played as a cross between Charlie Chaplin and the Cantinflas of Around the World in 80 Days, their slapstick antics guarantee laughs. Then there's the conjuration dance. When Dr. Pinch tries to exorcise Ephesean demons, his conjuration makes everyone weirder. They flop into a snaky, ritualized Bollywood dance that, while Pinch's spell lasts, is a hoot. Worth a try.

In Doug Wright's Pulitzer Prize-winning play, Charlotte gives a guided tour of the Mahlsdorf mansion, a museum specializing in the handcrafted Grunderzeit style (1870-1900). It's soon clear that she's the real museum. There are

creators and destroyers, of course. But there are also preservers. Charlotte made the latter a life work. One of the stunning features of Jefferson Mays' outstanding performance as Charlotte: the eerie calm at her core. Mays also convinces, in his piercing 1000-yard stare and unflinching, things-as-they-were recollections, that Charlotte has seen humankind at its absolute worst and can say with her uncle, Who knows what's still to come?' Mays has etched a rich, detailed, unforgettable (and Tony Awardwinning) portrait. And he plays everyone else: more than 30 others including the author, who learns to accept the "nicks and cuts" on an heirloom — each so precise you'll need to expand your idea of acting versatility. The Lady With All

The Answers

Ann Landers wrote advice columns for 47 years. She educated millions of readers (and herself) as she went along. People read her who never heard of Kinsev or David Reisman and she knew it: "I would rather have a column on 1000 refrigerator doors than a Pulitzer." David Rambo's script puts her at a crossroads: should the lady "with all the answers" write a column about her divorce? Should she tarnish an image as neatly tucked in place as her bouffanthelmet of hair? Not much to hang a play on, especially a two-acter with a foregone conclusion. Read-ings of Landers' Greatest Hits and some facts, the play has the earmarks of an approved biography. Image not only rules, it gets polished. Randy Graff, remarkably, gives the facts life. Dressed in blushing pink, talking with a pronounced she-CAW-go accent, and making everyone feel at home, in what is essentially an audienceparticipation event, Graff's excellent timing and rapport grant her permission, like Landers, to delve into intimate matters: ours, it turns out, if not hers. Ralph Funicello's set, tinted by Chris Rynne's wee hours lighting, is as detailed as the play isn't. Will Landers write

Double, double, toil and trouble? No. Something tasteful this way comes. Paul Mullins has directed a safe, formalist Macbeth, substituting stage pictures for substance. Instead of the Macbeths' insatiable frenzy, fed by "slaughterhouse thoughts," we get choreographed, often mathematically precise visuals. Some do catch the eve (whitefaced Weird Sisters in sleek, red, late-medieval chic; Macduff's spears poking through Balboa

Park toward Dunsinane). But the Sisters are cupcakes. The slo-mo battles are aesthetic affairs. And the leads are lame. Tom Hammond's Macbeth's a thoughtful, perplexed guy who delivers his lines with slow, sculpted cadences that don't come near the lion's roar. As Lady M, Deirdre Lovejoy resorts to deep breathing to convey emotion and plays her scenes as set pieces, apart from other actors (when she sleepwalks, Lovejoy makes Lady M a batty, candlehypnotized Ophelia: an odd, albeit showy, choice). Worthy of note: what lighting designer York Kennedy does with darkness. It shrouds the stage like a fogbank. And since the rest of the production prefers the stately to the gritty and the tragic, Kennedy's shadings become the only place where evil gets to stake its claim. The Male Intellect: An Oxymoron?

Julie dumped Bobby two weeks ago. Just split. His fiancée. Now he's so conflicted, so "out of balance," he can't even remember why. So Bobby decides to "find out what women want." He drinks Coronas and tries to discover as well his right-brain, "feminine"

side. He's a dysfunctional mess, but to his credit, and thanks to Julie, he at least recognizes it (though he shouldn't blame the Y chromosome; that's an old-hat dodge). *Male Intellect* never dips beneath pop psychology stereo types about gender but is a consistently funny 90-minute take on today's dating scene. Like Scrooge, Bobby is haunted by visitors: five male chauvinists ranging from a 123-year-old geezer still searching for the perfect woman to the Colonel, who deals with women by the book...his book. Ford Austin plays Bobby and the MCPs with an engaging audience rapport and an ability to disappear into another character. Robert Dubac wrote Male Intellect, which, like Forever Plaid and Late-Nite Catechism, has become an international touring show (you can't help but hear the author, behind the jokes, patting himself on the back for being such a sensitive dude). Asked which character he identified with most, Dubac replied: "Separately they are individuals, but put together all one guy. Women who see the play say, 'I've been out with every one of those guys!' Worth a try.





The trio is so talented, when the plot has them complain of difficulties to overcome, you wish they'd quit trumping up the pseudo-drama and get on with this highly entertaining, if lightweight show. The Winter's Tale

A "sad tale" may be best "for winter," as a character says, but the Old Globe's splendid Winter's Tale could become the hit of the summer. Although King Leontes has it all — loving wife pregnant with their second child, dear friends, sumptuous palace - for unaccountable reasons he goes absolutely nuts. Mad as Lear, bloodthirsty as Macbeth, Leontes breaks every bond he's ever known. Shakespeare supplies causes (at least five) but is much more concerned with healing the effect: how do you, or even can you, repair ultimate damage? How do you de-Hyde Dr. Jekyll? In Shakespeare's most amazing, openhearted statement about human nature, The Winter's Tale shows that a person can change, or change back, if given support, conviction, and time. The play jumps 16 years, and from winter to spring ("from things dying to

things newborn") and tragedy to comedy. Directed by Darko Tres-njak, the production's so adept at evoking the play's extreme atmospheres that when you're in the winter scenes, like being in the real dead of winter, it feels as if spring will never come. And, in the midst of chipper Act Four, scene four, vice versa. From Bruce Turk's solemn/loony Leontes, to Katie MacNichols's forthright, aching, wonderful Hermione, through all the ensemble work, the acting is first-rate. As is the design work: Ralph Funicello's spare, stained-wood set, Linda Cho's solemn/celebratory costumes, York Kennedy's Rembrandt-like lighting, and Christopher Walker's subtle sound design. Go see this one! Treat yourself.

Blue Oyster Cult

It started with a single oyster, a pearl of an oyster. The occasion was one of those Taste of the Gaslamp eat-arounds a few years ago. Too many of the participating restaurants took the cheap route, ladling out near-identical offerings of penne pasta with minor tomato-sauce variations. Blue Point, in contrast, served pristine raw oysters with a tart mignonette dip, and nothing could have hooked me faster. Since then, Blue Point has been my top candidate for the "best of breed" in the everexpanding Cohn Restaurant Group, but I've never found time to sit down and eat a meal there. With the latest, most lavish Cohn project - Island Prime - just opened on Harbor Island last week, it seemed a good moment to test my theory before venturing into the newest venue.

'I must say, the Cohns do make good-looking restaurants," said the Lynnester, inspecting the decor of Blue Point. I couldn't agree more. The interior resembles a converted Edwardian bank, or maybe ballroom. It combines the '50s and the '90s - the 1890s - with high ceilings, crown moldings, and vast chandeliers with oystershell-colored shades that cast a gentle glow (sometimes the glow grows so exceedingly gentle, one may need a flashlight to read the menu). The booths are soft, the rug is thick, the leatherlike chair pads are comfortable. At the far end is an open kitchen, with six or seven cooks a-cooking even on "slow" nights. But in summer, there are no slow nights: Hotel concierges, a waiter told me, often recommend Blue Point to conventioneers and tourists. Yet about a third of the diners looked like locals, maybe even regulars - they were appropriately dressed and they ordered well.

But before we subjected friends to the experiment, my partner and I made a scouting visit. We found the main part of the menu divided into "hook" (appetizers), "line" (seafood entrées), and "sinker" (desserts), with additional sections of cold seafoods, soups and salads, and meats. Our unnamed Washington State oysters (firm, plump, and briny) came with three dips, including a vibrant, sweet-tart sake-ginger mignonette. A "Maine lobster stack" appetizer seemed familiar — after searching our memory banks, we identified it as an upscale rendition of last week's shrimp parfait at Puerto La Boca. The top layer mixed lobster meat with full-fat mayo. Next came an inch of chopped avocado over shredded raw

Florence fennel (a.k.a. anise), all plated on a slick of orange-colored vanilla-mango vinaigrette punctuated with mandarin sections. The citrus and the charming sauce bought off some of the richness, but the mayo tsunami still struck me as a waste of good crustacean.

Crab-stuffed salmon trout was a hit. Its crisp skin was bathed in a delightful semi-sweet sauce of reduced apple cider. The flesh was

piled high with lump crabmeat and scattered with lightly toasted sliced almonds. Accompaniments were a few fingerling potatoes and shreds of greens. A dish of bacon-wrapped halibut seemed like a fine idea — a razor-thin slice of smoky meat to add flavor to a very mild fish — but we forgot to specify the doneness. By default, the fish was parched dry to touristic tastes. It came with fresh Oregon morel mushrooms, which, alas, were mixed with mealy English peas. (Too much heat has made a poor vintage in the local pea-vines this year.)

The table breads are terrific — a good thing, because many dishes here will have you sopping up the sauces. "We used to bake bread in-house," said our waiter, Owen, "but a few years ago, after we remodeled the kitchen, the bread ovens and the baker were moved to the Prado. We still get fresh loaves every day, ready to be finished off here." The sourdough is barely sour, and with its hard crust and cushiony white center, it would make a genuine muffaletta sandwich. The

brown pumpernickel is mild and sweet. If you ask nicely, your waiter will send you home with half-loaves of both, your choice of baked or

brown-and-serve. The wait staff here, by the way, furnish superior service compared to most local restaurants — they use their brains and have actually tasted everything on the menu.

We returned a few nights later with the Lynnester and our neighbor Francisco, who hails from the coast of Ecuador. A lobster bisque was so creamy that we were glad we could share it among a foursome. When it arrived piping hot, it seemed bland, but a pinch of salt and a moment's cooling brought it into focus. "This has port and rosemary, yes?" asked Francisco. "They make the taste less harsh than most bisques." He was right: A typical bisque includes sherry, which is nutty but sometimes sour, while port is sweeter and smoother. I learned

pensive self-parking one block east at Park It On Market. Large sidewalk dining patio. Sound level lively but not painful. Reservations urged. Business-casual dress looks best here. Fish cooked well done unless you specify otherwise.

later that the chef uses whole live lobster culls (one claw missing) rather than empty shells to obtain the rich lobster flavor, and he keeps the tomato to a minimum. Aswim in the center of the bowl were fingertip-size chunks of lobster. The more we sipped, the faster our spoons dipped. We were too polite to lick the bowl, but not too bashful to swipe our bread in the last drops of broth.

The two-level "Chef's Seafood Tower" is the featured appetizer extravaganza, available for two or more (\$18 per person), but a party of four should order it sized for two or three if they expect to eat entrées. That's not to say that you should necessarily order it at all; there are plenty more fish in this sea. The tower's bottom tier holds cold raw oysters (two per person), ordinary-quality large







prawns and raw ahi, and previously frozen crab legs and crab claws (with the shells evenly sawed off around the center). Tucked among them are the evening's creative mignonette (chipotle-spiked that night), cocktail sauce, and a delicious little seaweed salad dressed with toasted sesame oil. "My aunt used to work at a crab-processing plant in Washington state," said my partner. "She'd send us five-pound bags of these sawedoff crab claws, rejects because the shells were broken or jagged. They freeze the crab in brine because the salt keeps the water from freezing solid, so the meat doesn't get ice crystals. But the process drives the salt into the flesh. You keep the texture but you lose the taste." He took a big bite of leg meat. "Ooof, salty! That's gonna cost me another beer," he concluded.

On the top tier are clams and small blue mussels in a seductive saffron champagne sauce that again begs you to swab your bread in it. The shellfish didn't fare as well that evening. "You know how we South Americans overcook our seafood?" Francisco said, plucking a shriveled mussel-meat from its shell. "The cooks here must be Ecuadorian, like me.

Perhaps we should have ordered the jumbo lump crab cakes, instead — the chef's pride and joy, I learned. They're done East Coast style, with lots of crab and fresh herbs and no bready filler.

When we ordered our entrées, this time we remembered the magic words: "We're not Yuman!" we cried. "We're not Zonies! We live here and we don't want dried-out fish." The result: Everything was cooked perfectly.

Pan-seared dayboat scallops were sweet, tender, and translucent at the center, bathed in a caramelized shallot-herb sauce bedecked with copious shallot shreds, whole shallot cloves, and delicious micro pea-shoots, as slim and crisp as alfalfa sprouts. These were the clear, vivid flavors I'd been hoping for from this restaurant. Underneath were a few ravioli made of thick, slightly gummy spinach pasta, thinly stuffed with herbed goat cheese. (Lynne liked them, I didn't.) Horseradish-crusted salmon were Atlantic-farmed fish. (Its milder flavor is actually preferred by the Midwestern conventioneers who form so much of the patronage here.) The flesh was moist and flaky, topped with a pouf of flour and mild horseradish, and lightly dressed in a lemon-dill sauce. It came with one sawed-off crab claw and a succotash of corn, diced zucchini, new potato, ripe and sugary red bell pepper, and crab shreds, a combination that won the coveted Lynnester seal of approval.

The evening's special was a thick fillet of white sea bass from the Sea of Cortez, heavily salted on the surface, topped with refreshing julienne lemon rind and more of those wonderful fetal pea-shoots. It rode on a bed of white rice pilaf that everyone ignored. Alongside was a single butter-poached shelled Maine lobster claw ("oohs" and "aahs" all around) and slim, crisp-tender flageolet green beans.

As you'd expect, the pleaseall-comers menu includes numerous meat dishes. The steaks are USDA Prime, and the current crop (from primo purveyor Newport Meat) are dry-aged 28 days. Not yet aware of this marvel (had I known, I'd probably have ordered the ribeve), we chose a roast rack of lamb, cooked to our order to a beautiful dark-rose mediumrare and surrounded by a superb red-wine reduction sauce sweetened by invisible carrots. (It's one of those three-day production numbers with everything strained out after the final reduction.) "I've never eaten lamb this good," said Francisco, "And the sauce is really wonderful.' It came with a mini-cassoulet of white beans, carrots, greens, and merguez, earthy Tunisianstyle lamb sausage — a mixture as marvelous as the meat. The rack was my partner's favorite dish of the evening. Ditto Francisco. For the female side of the table, the scallops were a strong contender.

The wine list runs rather steep (for instance, a mere halfbottle of Trimbaugh Gewürz is \$46!) and is oddly short on whites by the glass. It does include a bottle of Matua Valley Marlborough (New Zealand) sauvignon blanc at just \$24a crisp, citrusy quaff that flatters all but the most richly sauced seafood.

All desserts are housemade, with all the chefs in the house collaborating on ideas for the ever-changing array and a recent CCA grad executing them. A butterscotch pot de crème features a dark chocolate pudding with a layer of caramel on top. Plunge in your spoon, and the center turns into a butterscotchchocolate swirl. You also get a fudgy dark chocolate biscotto (I guess that's the singular of biscotti) and a profiterole filled with vanilla whipped cream that tastes exactly like the filling of a Twinkie or Ding Dong. Of the evening's trio of housemade sorbets, one was an austere lemon-flavored ice. The others were creamy, more like sherbets, in flavors of coconut and mango, both intense and distinctive. (If they could talk, they'd probably say, "I yam what I vam.") The coconut vanished in mere seconds under the assault of four simultaneous spoons, and the mango was thoroughly appreciated. Even the decaf espresso was potable.

"You know, I've eaten at all of the Cohn restaurants except the pub-grub joint up in San Marcos," said the Lynnester. "Normally I'm not that crazy about them, but this is the best

of them. The ingredients seem as though they're higher quality here, and the dishes really work. Instead of just throwing on one thing after another, everything on the plate goes together.' QED: Theory confirmed.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Jonathan Hale is executive chef of Blue Point. "My mom was a really good cook," he says. "She is an editor and she did a lot of cookbooks, so I got the passion from her. I grew up in London, and around when I was 17 I moved to New York, where my best friend's mother was a restaurant critic. She'd take us out and say, 'You can't order all the same thing. You've got to try everything.' It was fun. During college, I was a history major, but I worked during the summers as a waiter on Cape Cod. I really enjoyed that, so I decided to go into the restaurant business. I worked at the Hyatt, and then I went to the CIA (Culinary Institute of America). After I got out in '92, I worked in restaurants in Aspen, Colorado, for three years, including a neat little French place. The chef-owner there had worked for Daniel Boulud [in Manhattan], and as his sous chef, I learned lots from him. Then I moved to Hawaii and worked for seven years for Jean-Marie Josselin at the A Pacific Cafe restaurant group in Maui and Kauai. When my wife and I had our first child, we came back to the mainland. "We were on a plane to New

York with our one-year-old, and

when we looked at the United Airlines map, I pointed to San Diego and asked my wife, 'Have you ever been?' I'd never been here either. We decided to move, as random as that --- we made our plans on the plane with the baby in our laps. We didn't know a soul here, but it turned out that a friend of mine from Hawaii was really good friends with people who work at the Prado, and they got me an introduction to David Cohn. Now I've been at Blue Point for four years.'

After the Cohn Group opened Mr. Tiki, up the block, Hale was splitting his time between the two restaurants, along with chef de cuisine Jesse Cruz (who now heads the Tiki kitchen). This proved difficult. "I came to realize it was a little too much, with two kids, two restaurants, to work at my best, so I came back here to focus exclusively on Blue Point.


"We get fish from five different companies...We found a little company that's really consistent with scallops from Boston. Scallops are so hard to get — there's not that many out there. I feel bad because we use so many, I feel personally responsible for annihilating many, many beds... We really have to be picky with our seafood, our produce." I asked if he had the freedom to buy and cook whatever he wanted. "Yes, part of the opportunity here is that we have free rein to do pretty much anything we want. David [Cohn] is receptive to just about anything we come up with." ■

White Transition

Maureen doesn't do the kind of foods I might eat, like meats.

o forth!" yells Carla from the rehab place next to the Coronado Hospital. She's stuck here with her mending broken leg. "And don't come back till you can bring me honest reports. Have the Anglos destroyed it

all? Is there nothing left of our patrimonio?'

I can see there'll be nothing left of our matrimonio if I don't. Čarla has this bee in her bonnet about "what's happening to Old Town," 'cause some new guys ("from Buffalo, New York!") are changing the

name of the place where her great-great-whatever used to live, like, 175 years ago. The Casa de Bandini. It's now gonna be "Hotel Cosmopolitan."

So here I am at Old Town plaza, early evening on a Wednesday. Just starting to cool. Sun's at, oh, about four fingers off the horizon - Interstate 5, that is. I wander into the Casa de Bandini. Or is it the Cosmopolitan already? Actually, it looks pretty much the same, except I guess the bright colors are gone. Maybe it's the servers, dressed in modest Victorian dresses. People sit 'round in varnished judges' chairs under cream canvas awnings. Just looks a little...duller. My problem is that most of their food costs way more than the jingle I have in my pocket. So I head out and down toward what used to be Bazaar del Mundo. I'm thinking maybe I can create a picnic in the plaza. I stop in first at Alvarado Provisions, one of the throwback stores packed



with things like traditional candies. Maureen she's wearing a long, sweeping Victorian dress, too (come to think of it, women look nice like this, graceful) - doesn't do the kind of foods I might eat, like meats. But I buy a scrumptious-looking or-

ange-and-cranberry muffin (\$1.50) from her anyway. I'll have that with a coffee, later.

First, I've gotta eat. I walk into the old Bazaar del Mundo. Signs up everywhere say this is now the Plaza del Pasado. Square of the Past. Huh. The shops and cafés here, too, seem, well, less colorful.

More planned. Sober. Emptier. Not of people, but of stuff, mainly those crazy-colored things from South America the shops used to have.

I end up back in the main plaza at what had been Rancho El Nopal. Now it's the Jolly Boy Saloon and Restaurant. Basically the same patio, though, with white columns, old bougainvillea and cactus. Alexis the hostess leads me to a varnished table. I notice that the round judges' chairs and the cream canvas awnings are just like the ones in the other places. Juan the waiter brings a big solid menu book. Inside it says that this place reflects the "transition" period between 1846 and 1856. Traditional Mexican food, plus new-style American seafood from the fishing industry that was starting up back then.

I scan it all. Uh, I'll be having something from soups, salads, or, at the top of the budget, an ham-

burguesa. Most entrée-size stuff's in the teens. But a few make the single-figure list. Tacos de Pollo Verde are \$7.95, fish tacos are \$9.95, torta de pollo is \$8.95 with fries, and the half-pound "fire-roasted" burguesa with fries is \$7.95. Chicken Caesar salad is \$10.95.

What brought me in here was the albóndigas. Meatball soup. It has an asterisk beside it, which means this is the same soup they were serving back in 1854 when the original Jolly Boy started up. Huh. And, only \$4.75.

"Would that be enough, like, to fill me?" I ask Alexis.

"I think so," she says.

'A classic 1850s meatball soup," the menu says. "Chayote, turnips, potatoes, carrots, onions, tomatoes, cumin, and oregano, garnished with mint leaves."

Chayote is that Mexican squash veggie you can put in just about anything.

Juan brings the chips and salsa. Ooh. Salsa's got bite. 'Course these are going to save the day. Can keep chomping them down till I'm full. Plus, I just order water. I chat with Oscar the violinist, one of the two musicians sitting out his break nearby. "They don't have mariachis in the new setup," he says. "Just two or three musicians wandering around."

And it seems like they play "transitional" music. He and his guitarist buddy Ramon launch into "Novillero," a bullfighting song, then hit "Roll Out the Barrel."

Juan brings the albóndigas. Three big meatballs with tons of diced veggies in the soup. Nicely seasoned — that mint leaf's great — and I just keep taking chips to add solids. When all's said and done, and the rising tide in my gut leaves me feeling less whiny, this is still a great place. No traffic, beautiful violin playing, folks sauntering - and that funny-peculiar knowledge that dons, merchants, ruffians, and ranchers all probably sat exactly here, 150 years ago, chomping and slurping on the samerecipe albóndigas, thanking the Lord they'd escaped the Bad Olde World, or grizzling about what a hick pueblo this was, or how those danged gringos just seemed to keep coming and coming.

Light's fading. Grass in the plaza's getting luminous green. I pay up my — heh heh — \$5.12 and go look for a coffee. Want to sit down in the plaza, where they had all those bullfights and hangings and Judge Roy Bean, uh, hung out, and enjoy Maureen's orange-and-cranberry muffin. Oh, and think of something to get Carla, to soften the blow that, yeah, the gringos have taken Grandpaw's casa back. ■

jority of Parker's "perfect" 100-point wines were French.

Which brings us to Hendra's reason number two. The energetic support of the American wine industry? As opposed to whom? The French? Not so. "With the 1995 vintage, the whole Parker commercial system started working," says one Bordeaux negotiant. For a top estate, "The difference between a score of 85 and 95 was 6 to 7 million Euros." "If a chateau received a score of 100," notes McCoy, "it could multiply its price by four." Or as opposed to the English? Writes McCoy of the upstart British brokerage Farr Vintners, "They subscribed to the Wine Advocate, bought what Parker recommended, started including his scores in their catalog, and their business grew rapidly.... Far Vintners is now the largest seller of Bordeaux futures in Britain.'

Finally, there was this from Hendra's review: "Going patriotic pushes McCoy into some unfortunate journalism. Setting the stage for the emperor's advent in the early '80s, she writes, 'A huge number of Americans...were energetically and enthusiastically educating themselves about wine in ways other countries, including France, never had.' No sources are cited for this preposterous assertion." The next line from the book: "Within a decade, tasting, comparing, and discussing French wines would, as Nicholas Faith wrote, 'spread more widely through the American social system than it had over the previous two hundred years in England, let alone in France.'" That's from Faith's book The Winemasters of Bordeaux: The Inside Story of the World's Greatest Wines.

But Hendra explains himself in the review's first line -I just hadn't noticed it right off: "Robert M. Parker Jr., wine cop to the world, is a polarizing figure whose fierce judgments are echoed by the ferocity of his advocates and opponents." Ah.

About the review, McCoy says, "My book tends to be a kind of Rorschach test. People who really hate Parker and his influence think I'm not critical enough of Parker. People who

absolutely love Parker think that I'm too critical of Parker. Personally, I don't see how anybody could read my book and think that I am a disciple of Parker. But I was surprised by certain things when I was writing the book, and one of them was the vehemence which people had when they spoke about Parker, the polarization I found. So many people would say to me either 'He's been awful for the wine world' or 'He's practically a saint.' I tried to reflect that polarization, because it's interesting that somebody would evoke that kind of emotion. One person said that some of the reactions to Parker are almost more like religious reactions."

The smoking-wood is mellow hickory, and each type of meat (sublime "pulled pork," smoky skewered shrimp, huge pork ribs, chicken, beef ribs, steak) gets individualized treatment, including a tangy Alabama-style mustard sauce for pork and chicken. (Beef gets the more familiar tomatoey Texas-style sauce.) You don't eat meat? The ever-expanding menu now includes a delicious, spicy blackened grilled salmon steak. Side dishes are superb: Don't miss the thick, smoky-sweet Brunswick stew (you'll not find its like anywhere on this coast), exemplary hush puppies, corn muffins with honey butter, well-balanced slaw.... Oh, just taste everything you can fit un-der your belt. Lunch/dinner daily, breakfast weekends. Low moderate. N.W. (6/05)

The Bird House Grill 250 North Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-2882. A great place to check out real Turkish cuisine. The inside has a fine collection of blue-and-white wall plates and blue glass eyes to ward off evil spirits. Try the house specialty, Iskender Kebab (ground meat kebab, rice, tomato sauce, and house-grown yogurt) — "Iskender" means "Alexander." Or the Kofte plate "Iskender (ground meat kebab, rice, salad, pita, and *tzatziki* sauce). The shepherd's salad is a traditional dish brimming with fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, onions, parsley, oil, and lemon. Good healthy Mediterranean diet. Even the baklavas are less gloopy. The traditional dishes are gener-ally the most successful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. They make the pies with traditional thin, crisp crusts the pies with traditional thin, crisp crusts and toppings like pepperoni, meatball, garlic, and "whitestone" (mozzarella, Parmesan, ricotta, garlic, and spinach). Maybe their best is the "Bronx Special," an assortment of pepperoni, sausage, onions, olives, mushrooms, pepper and garlic, said to fell New Yorkers quicker'n one of James's right uppercuts. The baked Greek halfchicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gy-ros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American three-egg breakfast specials with home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburgers, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkeyburger. Open seven days. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations in-clude Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Pizzeria in Leucadia, and Vig

If you're planning on a multicourse feast, order your meal a few dishes at a time or everything will be served at once: the staff is accommodating but limited-English. Over 20 vegan entrées. Full bar, Chinese beers, generic wines. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. -N.W. (8/04)

Madras Cafe 9484 Black Mountain Road, Mira Mesa, 858-695-6229. In the same strip mall as Ashoka the Great, this family-friendly café features the sayory vegetarian cuisine of South India. It's distinctly different from the standard North Indian menus, centering on nu-merous varieties of stuffed pancakes from thin, crisp (and irresistible) crepelike *dosais* stuffed with vegetable curry to lacy rice-flour *aapams* drenched in coconut milk to hefty, frittata-like uttapams. (Try the latter with the delicious, not-too-spicy chile-onion stuffing.) Puffy poori bread and tamarind rice are spectacular. Order your dishes in the sequence you hope to eat them — that's usually how they come out of the kitchen. And don't expect hovering "Raj"- style service — it's just not the Tamil way. Daytimes are for dim sum (Chinese tapas), served daily until 3 p.m., plus champagne dim sum brunches on weekends. Along with standard items, the choices here leap to the latest Pacific creations, some rarely found this side of the ocean, including irresistible Shanghai soup dumplings. Dinners range from folk food to showy "gold cup" dishes. For a taste treat and visual hoot, try the sea bass with pine nuts, sculpted to re-semble a dish sponge. (And the coffee is excellent.) Lunchtime features sandwiches on flavorful Bread & Cie breads while dinner runs to San Diego international-eclectic cookery that can be hit-or-miss. Affordable wines and corkage. Steep stairs to all dining areas. All nearby pay parking is uphill in a garage under Trattoria Acqua or up on Prospect. Unisex rest room. Open three meals Tuesday through Sunday; breakfast/lunch Mondays. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (3/04)

The Cheese Shop 2165 Avenida de la Playa, La Jolla, 858-459-3921. Used to be the Cheese Shop had 100 varieties of cheese from all over. No more. "The cheese trade is dead," says owner Phil Schutz. They still have all-cheese sandwiches with mixes of provolone, Monterey Jack, Cheddar, Swiss, Muenster, Danish Havarti, or Norwegian Jarlsberg. But today this small, busy café is more famous for its "overstuffed" meat sandwiches. The leg of lamb, top round beef, and roast pork loin are all spit-roasted right beside you as you walk in, to waken your taste buds. Cheeses like crumbled Greek Mizithra add tang to the taste. If you're into salami and ham, try the footlong. Free peanuts while you wait. Inexpensive. Other location: 627 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-232-2303, open daily breakfast to late lunch, with delivery to downtown addresses. — *E.B. (10/01)*

Daily's Renaissance Towne Centre, 8915 Towne Centre Drive, La Jolla, 858-453-1112. The restaurant is owned by a doctor who has devised a menu that's low-fat, low-calorie, low-sodium. The dishes look and taste wonderful. All items available for takeout. Lunch and dinner (same menu) daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

French Pastry Shop 5550 La Jolla Boulevard (at Forward Street), La Jolla, 858-454-9094. A longstanding fixture of the Bird Rock area, this bakery/restaurant includes both a simple, spacious dining room and a shaded patio (reputedly San Diego's first dining patio). Breakfast — a highlight of the menu is served until 4 p.m. The whisper-thin crépes with luscious stuffings speak in a Gallic accent. Other possibilities include omelets, eggs Benedict variations, and fine-quality brioches and croissants. Pastries are moist, fairly light, and very sweet. Dinner entrées focus on updated French classics, e.g., duck breast a' l'orange, with "early bird" bargains. Open daily for breakfast through early dinner. — *N.W. (5/02)*

Harry's Coffee Shop 7545 Girard Avenue (at Pearl), La Jolla, 858-454-7381. When Harry Rudolph II opened Harry's back in 1960, his idea was simple: to create a down-home eatery and soda fountain where all La Jolla — rich, poor, Brahmins, and gardeners) — could mix and meet with plenty of good eats. Everyone from Joan Kroc to Junior Seau to Brooke Shields has been spotted here, along with regular folks who've been coming in for three decades. Now Harry III reigns quietly among a dozen whirling dervish waitresses at lunch, while his dad still works the breakfast shift. The big hamsteak and eggs is a favorite breakfast, as is the simple, rich "Hot Creamy Oatmeal" with strawberries. Pecan pancakes and thin, crisp waffles ring true to many Easterners (though Harry offers thick Belgianstyle waffles, too), and for lunch, turkey burgers and the bacon-loaded British Burger are popular. At the counter, the banter between been-here-forever waites and customers sounds like family life. Nice sidewalk patio, too. Long lines on weekends, Inexpensive, - E.B. (2/03) Trattoria Acqua 1298 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-0709. This popular restaurant has charming decor, with arched doorways dividing a warren of white-painted, high-ceilinged rooms and terraces arranged around a tiled, heated courtyard. The seasonally changing menu could be called "avant-garde Italian," a style that more than pushes the Italian envelope with assorted international influences. The food can be divine — or dismaying. Given Acqua's "destination restaurant" status, there's a surprising air of bean-counting that manifests itself in oddly lightweight silverware, waiters unclear about proper wine service, and, at times, tired veggies. Desserts, though, are superb. Full bar with extensive, wide-ranging wine list that includes half bottles as well as choices by the glass. Walk-ins accepted but weekend reservations advised. Restaurant is two floors down from Prospect, with validated parking in underground garage on Coast Boulevard. Elevator access from both directions (Acqua's stop is the first floor). Lunch or brunch and dinner seven days. Moderate (pastas) to very expensive.

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Adam's Steak N' Eggs 1201 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-291-1103. Morning munchers take heart! Adam's has served nothing but breakfasts since 1966. The menu runs from healthy — hot oatmeal with raisins, dates, sunflower seeds, almonds, pineapple and coconut — to corn fritters to a Southern brunch of spicy sausage patties, biscuits, gravy, grits, and eggs, to spiced apple crèpes with whipped cream and pecans. But the signature dish is steak and eggs. The steak's a high-walled chunk of meat almost as thick as it is round. Comes with two eggs, potatoes or grits, and toast or tortillas. You won't need lunch. This bricky, dark wood, clubby, business-convention-tourist kind of place has ver-ry faithful customers. But if you want to walk there, be ready for lack fois disewalks, one-way bus access, and wild morning traffic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

Aladdin's Cafe 5420 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-573-0000; Uptown Shopping Center, 1220 Cleveland Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-574-1111. These cafés offer a bright, clean atmosphere for bright and clean, if rather generic, Middle Eastern favorites (hummus, tabbouleh, kebabs, *shawemna*, etc.), plus imaginative Levantineflavored pizzas and salads. There are ample choices for vegetarians. The Hillcrest location offers beer and wine. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

Dumpling Inn 4619 Convoy Street #F, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-9638. Hole-inthe-wall? Yes. But what a hole-in-the wall. For those who love the Far East and its food, finding the Dumpling Inn is a little revelation. It's located in the busy Jasmine/Korean Market Center among Oriental herbalists, man-size-vase shops, even feng shui experts. The Inn itself is tiny but charming. Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold firecrackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd conical straw hat. The food is serious but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried three-ingredient *lo mein* (thick noodles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are challenging and exciting, as is the Dumpling Dinner (including hot-and-sour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork, bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jellyfish salad crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Lunch and early dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (5/02)*

Lightnin' Jacks BBQ Clairemont Town Square, 4705-H Clairemont Drive (near movieplex), Clairemont, 858-270-8227. Clean, cute, and a little self-conscious, this barbecue (under the same ownership as next-door Dino's Greek Restaurant) has black-and-white Western pictures on the walls and some seating on barstools with metal "saddles" (more comfortable than they look). The barbecue mechanism is a Texas-style pit smoker burning sweet hickory. The meats that emerge from it aren't the smokiest, but they're tasty enough. Pork ribs are tender and moist, and beef brisket carries enough smoke flavor to pass muster in Texas; other meat choices are less successful. The tomatoey sauce is pleasant but ordinary. A fried catfish plate makes a flavorful alternative (but beware the cat sandwich, awash in hot sauce). Hush puppies and sweet potato fries are the most savory sides. Check your take-out bag to make sure you're getting what you ordered, as youthful staff is easily flustered. Kiddie plates available. No alcohol. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *N.W. (1005)*

New Shanghai 4681 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-569-4833. New Shanghai is busy, friendly, and draws a mostly Chinese clientele because their Chinese food isn't "Americanized." Whatever your gastronomic politics, try the generous plateful of dry braised shrimp, the "de-fatted pork shoulder," the hot tripe, and the ingenious red bean pancake dessert. Inexpensive to moderate. — M.N. (4/99)

Rosie and Joe's Grill & Cantina 7986 Armour Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-277-5777. Joe Polizzi and his wife Rosalie started this place in 1959. Now his son Paul and wife Lynn run it as a New Mexico-style eatery-sports barpatio café with karaoke and mini-golf. Popular dishes include the "Beerubin" sandwich (corn beef on rye with sauerkraut, Gouda cheese), the Sweet Sicilian sandwich (grilled Italian sausage sautéed onions, bell peppers, provolone), and the California Chili Burger (with roasted chilis, onions, Gouda cheese). Also good: the Pescado Vera Cruz (pangrilled fish with caramelized onions). Yes, it's out in the industrial wilds of Kearny Mesa, but it has a Cheers feel to it. Open for lunch, dinner, seven days. Inexpensive; dinners moderate. -E.B. (1/04)

Spice House Cafe 9035 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Complex Drive, across from courthouse), 858-565-1028. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hangover Omelet. We don't know if it's the Ortega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. The place is a pleasant surprise jutting out into the top foliage of trees sprouting up from Hwy. 163 — the view looks like a forest. Other excellent choices include Portuguese sausage with three eggs, paisano frittata with ham, tomatoes, mushrooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped cream. Open daily, breakfast and lunch, dinner nightly, with emphasis on Greek-American cuisine. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

THE BEACHES

Chateau Orleans 926 Turquoise Street (at Mission Boulevard), Pacific Beach, 858-488-6744. Just like eating in the French Quarter — at one of Bourbon Street's best tourist traps, complete with live music and party atmosphere. The lovely multiroom premises have a real Crescent City "let the bon temps rouler" feel to it, but the simpler Southern dishes — honest crab cakes, fried catfish — seem better bets than the kitchen's attempts at more demanding Acadian fare. Reservations strongly advised. A little dressy on weekends. Full bar. Wheelchair users may need help with rest room doors. Dinner Monday through Saturday. High moderate. — *N.W. (2/02)*

China Inn 877 Hornblend Street (between Garnet and Grand), Pacific Beach, 858-483-6680. The enormous menu here offers Mandarin and Szechuan specialties including especially good sweetand-pungent shrimp, Mandarin pork rib, duck in orange sauce, and shrimp in garlic sauce. The setting is simple but the food is outstanding. If chef-owner Andy Kam is present, ask his advice about the day's best dishes. Open daily, continuous service, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

Fairouz Cafe And Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food.

The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Leabnese feast at low cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — E.W.

Karinva Thai & Vegetarian Cuisine 4475 Mission Boulevard (SeaCoast Square), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie The Beach, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes getting off on the coconut curries like gang ped, panang, and kang kari. Or noodle dishes like the famous pad thai. But they're in the right place: Karinva remains true to its Thai origins. The tom yum kung (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table, the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course nam pla, Thai fish sauce. A nice counterpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. An-other sizzler: *pad talay*, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in *The Beach*. Ranchos Cocina 1830 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-226-7619; 4705 Point Loma Avenue, Ocean Beach, 619-224-9815. Also at 3910 30th Street (at University Avenue), North Park, 619-574-1288. At all locations of this delightful mini-chain, you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak - in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an an-ground. And sample something with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, try — anything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No

reservations, but call ahead for large parties. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (6/01)

Rum Jungle Smoothies and Deli 4150 Mission Boulevard #153, Promenade Mall, Pacific Beach, 858-273-2227. Why do Brazilians have more fun? *Açaí* (ah-saa-ee). Why do Brazilians settle in PB? Maybe it's because Rum Jungle Smoothies serves up *açaí*, the flesh of a Brazilian palm nut, for breakfast. The dark purple mush comes from the *açaí* palms that grow around the Amazon River delta. Rum Jungle adds granola, banana, strawberries, blueberries, mango pieces, and honey to make a surprisingly filling breakfast. Of course this bright little place has lots of other smoothies, too, along with garden burgers and sandwiches. But the *açaí* power fruit bowl is what keeps them coming back. Open 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (*1/04*)

Sportsmen's Seafoods 1617 Quivira Road, Mission Beach, 619-224-3551. Fifty years ago this restau rant-fish market was a tuna cannery, part of San Diego's late-lamented fishing in dustry. The same Sicilian family still owns it, and still knows everything about fish and how to cook it. The menu is de-voted to the "fruits of the sea" and includes a wonderful seafood platter (shrimp, squid, clams, fish, fries, and salad). And, of course, a crispy-crunchy fish-and-chips platter. Eat outside on deck, contemplating the small ships on the bay. They buy seasonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their at tached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fishermen. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Mondays. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

Stickee Fingers Barbeque Smokehouse 1404 Garnet Avenue (at Gresham), Pacific Beach, 858-581-6526. Chef-owner Sonny Choudo is an Egyptian Jew from Mexico City who learned to cook in Israel but fell in love with bar-becue on a trip to Texas. This bright little room has big windows and a few tables, with Mexican folk art chile-pepper posters on the walls. Outside is a pleasant wooden patio with a few more wooden tables and an oil drum smoker where the meats are cooked over sweet hickory chunks. Best bets are the tender pork ribs and smoky brisket. Sauce is shallow-flavored and very toma-toey. Sides include a lively coleslaw and an unexpectedly sophisticated heart of romaine salad with Caesar dressing. Street parking (difficult). Italian sodas, but no alcohol. Free delivery in PB with minimum order. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. -NW (1/05)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Just Fabulous Kensington 4116 Adams Avenue, Kensington, 619-584-2929. At this usually-packed café, painted in cheerful Creamsickle col-ors, noted dessert-chef Beryl Ann Byrd and co-chef Kurt Metzger offer a full menu of seasonal California-Mediterranean cuisine. At dinner, appetizers are generally fun to eat but entrées can be inconsistent. Weekend brunch dishes are terrific. The primary emphasis is on desserts, of course: Byrd's pastries are of the Euro-influenced American mode very sweet, a little heavy, a touch more sophisticated than Mom's apple pie. The pastry case doubles as a retail counter for sweets-to-go. Affordable interna-tional wine list and coffeehouse specialty beverages. Few tables, no reservations Arrive early or late on weekends or expect to wait. No alcohol allowed at outdoor tables. Street parking only. Open three meals daily. Moderate. — N.W. (9/04)

Jyoti-Bihanga 3351 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-282-4116. Oh sure, you'll be watching Sri Chinmoy, the Bengali guru, on TV juggling, declaring Geneva International Airport a "Peace Blossom," or boarding his Italian *"Treno della Pace.*" Plus, his books, his portraits, his paintings, and his chant-songs surround you. Apart from that, not only is this heavenly blue-domed restaurant run by his students peaceful, but the fresherthan-fresh Bengali-tinged health food is delicious. Their chutney-topped "Neatloaf" bursts with nutty, intriguing flavors. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes different. Also delish: Brahma Burrito, "Infinite Blue" (interesting brown rice salad with bleu cheese dressing), and the Shiva Wrap (tofu and fresh veggies with a well-integrated curry flavor). On cold days, start with a steaming sweet pea soup. Monday through Saturday lunch and dinner, Sunday brunch only. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (1001)*

Mama's Bakery and Lebanese Deli 4237 Alabama Street, North Park, 619-688-0717. This informal little restaurant is more interested in quality than presentation, concentrating on the specialties they do well. Mama's offers quick meals with a culinary tradition, definitely not "fast food," but with fast food prices and ease. Recommendations include the deliciously cheap falafel sandwich in Mama's fresh-made *sajj*, (soft flatbread). On cool days warm up to a bowl of *fool mudamas*, or slowcooked beans (tasty fava and garbanzos). Try also spinach pie, *labneh* (creamy cheese, olive oil, and pita), and *baba ghanoush* (smoky pureed eggplant and hummus). Inexpensive. — *M.N.* (1/99)

Phuong Trang Vietnamese Seafood Restaurant 5296 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-582-0603. Original branch at 4170 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6750. Tired of putting up with the crowds at the pop-ular Convoy Street restaurant? Go east, where you'll find the same menu without the hassles. The fare centers on Viet-namese "people's food" emphasizing numerous genres of noodle soups, but there are a handful of more elegant house specialties — including the extraordinary "Special Sauce" Dungeness crab from the live tank. (The sauce is tangy tamarind.) Call ahead to order steamed or grilled live-tank catfish. Reservations and credit cards accepted, both branches. Vietnamese beers including "33"; just two generic wines, but you can bring your own. Also bring a pad and write down the numbers of your orders to give the waiter, as staffers speak little English. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate (higher for live-tank seafood). *N.W. (3/04)*

South Park Bar and Grill 1946 Fern South Park Bar and Gnii 1946 Fern Street, South Park/Golden Hill, 619-696-0096. A genuine American bistro. This loud, lively, very local wa-tering hole started out serving savory comfort-food to an appreciative neigh-borhood patronage; now the whole city's flocking in. Chef Eric Wilburn learned his chops at Bradley Ogden's Lark Creek Inn; if he cooks "mom food," it's more than a cut above mom's. Appetizer/bar menu runs to ordinary pub-grub (but crab cakes or red pepper hummus stand out); entrées get interesting, including indulgent "Stuffed Shrimp and Scallops Florentine," a juicy rib-eye steak, and a light-textured meat loaf. Nightly specials ways worth a try. Considerate serv ice. Full bar, including international wines at easy prices. Park at edge of Gala lot. Reservations only for parties of five or more, so expect a wait most nights. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday; bar menu weekends until midnight; weekend brunches and weeknight reduced-price "early bird specials." Upper moderate to expensive. - N.W. (7/03)

Zensei 3396 30th Street (at Upas), North Park, 619-546-617. This muchwelcomed neighborhood restaurant in a restaurant-starved neighborhood offers a changing menu of sushi, fusion appetizers, and Japanese entrées emphasizing noodle dishes. The sushi is the main draw. It's well made and based on seafood from the same fishmonger used by Ota and Nobu. The "party rolls" (such as "stuffed tomato" and "honeymooners") may not be original, but they're delicious fun. Free parking behind restaurant (enter by alley on Upas east of Jack in the Box lot). Reservations advised for Friday/Saturday evenings, accepted for two or more at sushi bar, four or more at tables. Japanese and American beers, sakes, and wines. Lunch Monday through Saturday; dinner seven days. — N.W. (1/05)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Antonio's Hacienda 700 North Johnson Avenue, El Cajon, 619-442-9827. If the décor hasn't been updated from its original 1960s-fabu-lous Old California Spanish, it's because there's been no need. The enormous dark-wood chandeliers, the padded-leather wooden chairs, the chainsawweathered wood beams - all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, reveling in the guitar trio and the exposed kitchen station — such atmosphere! And the flavors are user-friendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. The Camarones Tequila is a little more exciting; the sweetness of its bacon-wrapped shrimp gets a fine counter from the bitter liquor in the marinade. Excellent Enchiladas Suizas pale, mush-tender shredded chicken wrapped in tortillas and doused with good, tangy green sauce. Lunch and din-ner daily. Champagne brunch on Sundays, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; all-day buffet Sunday through Thursday. Inexpensive to low moderate. -A.M. (4/03)

Cafe Zia 6686 El Cajon Boulevard (at Montezuma), College Area, 619-337-3937. South Asia meets Mexicol Khaled Zia had the brilliant idea of combining tacos (or wraps or bagels) with chicken and South Asia's great gift to the world: chutney — mango chutney, papaya chutney, peach, apple, even a serrano chili pepper chutney. The combo works with them all. As soon as you smell the chicken strips hissing away on the grills, you're hooked. Then when they come smothered in peach or mango chutney, or cooling yogurt, along with sweet-sauced potatoes, what can you do? Do as half of San Diego State does: just say yes. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

Chef Taka 7520 El Cajon Boulevard (at Parks), Mesa Plaza, La Mesa, 619-463-0231. This is indeed the same Chef Satate Taka who co-founded Taka in the Gaslamp, and then Octopus Garden. In July 2003 he moved his kitchen to La Mesa where he now cooks his inventive Japanese-based fusion cuisine with French, Mexican, and Chinese touches. Try the dreamy soft-shell crab with "salsa cream aioli," the tender tempura, or the traditional Teishoku dinner. Taka generally presides at the sushi bar. The staff is small so for the best cooking and service, dine on a weeknight and make an evening of it weekends can be hectic. For a bubbly treat try chilled Nigori (unfiltered) sake, served in the traditional manner in an overflowing square wooden cup. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Happy hour bargains nightly; regular prices moderate to expensive. — N.W. (3/04)

Downtown Cafe 182 East Main Street, El Cajon, 619-440-5687. Surprise! Not far from Magnolia and Maina French-style sidewalk café. The successful "Por Favor" eateries' owner launched this as a kind of Mexican patio restaurant, but serving gringo food. And it works, maybe because of reasonable prices for baby-back pork ribs, giant burritos, or Louisiana Chicken strips. Or even the veggie burger. But it's partly where you dine: out on the patio. The place has lots of ancient doors and wrought iron-andwood window frames, laced with creepers. Inside is a beautiful long bar with a counter on the street and chess sets so you can play and watch the world go by. Lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (5/03)*

Tyler's Taste of Texas 576 North Second Street, El Cajon, 619-444-9295. Unfussy home cooking. Some dishes outshine others. The slab of smoky ham steak that comes with the first-rate breakfast is in itself enough to rouse the sleepiest appetite. Expertly sautéed onions and mushrooms lend flavor to fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebbly-smooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character. For lunch and dinner, the Texas meut features Texas-style barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and sausage) that's sufficiently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. BBQ beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. The Mission North Park and City **Bakery** 2801 University Avenue, North Park, 619-220-8992 (also at Mission Beach and East Village). "Urban assault food for a revolutionary people," the waitstaff's black T-shirts. But the food here is less revolutionary than halfway between health-nut and greasy spoon. Still, their "conscientious cuisine is generous, good looking, and intelli-gent, if a little middle-class timid. Breakfasts are big here. Delicious chicken-ap-ple sausage and eggs come on a foot-wide plate loaded with unskinned rosemary potatoes, scrambled eggs, and scrump-tious baked-on-the-spot rosemary bread. A typical entrée includes a hunk of red (or "the other white") meat cooked on a wood-fired grill, smeared with a precooked sauce that, for better or worse, first meets its mate on the plate. Meat-avoiders will find fish and poultry dishes, too. Tasty taters but dull veggies come with most entrées. Desserts run to fruity favorites like cobblers, crisps, and upside-down cake. Treats from the wide-ranging beverage list include three-glass wine flights in four styles of wine, and a pleasant house brew, Dakota Pale Ale, that suits the food. The two-floor restaurant offers big plush booths, tall windowed walls, and a piano player gliding from rinky-dink 1950's pop to Fats Waller stylings and Ellingtonian riffs. Valet parking. Full bar. ing Happy Hours and some evenings. If you're looking for food, too, there's a shockingly fine corned beef and cabbage, resembling the corned beef of Katz's Deli on the Lower East Side — it's that wee touch o' the garlic that does the trick. Other choices include Guinness beef stew, shepherd's pie (made with ground beef), chicken pot pie, steaks, lamb chops, fish and chips, and grilled fish, plus standard pub grub. Lunch and dinner (including Irish breakfast any time) daily. Moderate. — N.W. (3/02)

Kansas City Barbecue 610 West Market Street (at Harbor Drive), downtown, 619-231-9680. Scrumptious smells waft across the tracks at the Seaport Village trolley stop — barbecued pork and beef. And yeah, this is the joint where Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis did their "sleazy bar scene" in *Top Gun*. And it is kinda sleazy, especially in the shadowy horseshoe bar, with memorabilia like hanging bras, Czech license plates, and stickers ("Grow Your Own Dope: Plant A Man"). The beef and pork ribs (or rib tips or chicken breast) are worth it. They're cooked over an oak-fueled fire. Nice long Happy Hour (3:30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., at bar only) has great food/grub deals. Open daily, lunch until late, serving until 1 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (3/01)*

The Latin Room 560 Fourth Avenue (at Market), Gaslamp, 619-237-7800. This austere, concrete-floored space is mainly a tequila bar, offering at least 120 brands to sample and tasty Mexican cocktails made from scratch. But you can also get a reasonably interesting Mexican meal from a menu that's considerably more ambitious than the neighborhood's regular border-Mex yawns. It offers excellent tortilla soup, decent ceviche, and filet mignon strewn with *cuitlacoche* (a.k.a. "corn mushrooms," a mild and juicy black fungal delicacy), with recipes imported here by a chef who used to cook at Tijuana's revered Cien Años restaurant. A couple can easily make a meal of a few shared appetizers. At 10 p.m. weekends, the place goes disco, with cover charge (IDs checked). Open nightly for dinner, appetizer menu until 2 a.m. on weekends. Moderate to expensive. — *N.W.* (*1/04*)

Max New York Steakhouse and Seafood 827 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-235-8500. As steakhouses go, Max is a good value, offering huge portions of fine, gently raised near-organic meat, cooked to order and offered at relatively gentle prices. You don't even have to pay extra for your veggies. For beef, there's full-flavored naturally raised Angus or butter-tender Kobe-style Wagyu beef from Idaho. Or you can choose a giant rack of lamb, so tender it should be called "Certified Agnus." Sauces tend to be pedestrian; request them on the side. The classic steakhouse appetizers are done with some smart twists. Superb international wine list at below-average markups, including plenty by the glass. Full bar. Valet parking, or inexpensive lot via alley two doors north. Open nightly, until midnight on weekends. Upper moderate to very expensive. — *N.W. (3/04)*

Morton's of Chicago 285 J Street (between Second and Third), Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxurious, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their Nebraska beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-a-half or three-pound porterhouse, which will be juicy, marbled with flavorful fat. You can also get good fish at Morton's. The big, golden salmon fillet flakes to the fork and is moist, sweet, buttery. The pricey à la carte sides are either bad or mediocre. The Godiva Hot Chocolate Cake is exceptional. But go for the steak. Expensive. — *M.N. (9/99)*

Nagi's Bar and Grill 501 West Broadway, downtown, 619-233-5933. Nagi Sekla comes from Egypt, via Paris. Before he took over the lease at the staid Koll Center's bar-eatery, he insisted on creating a sidewalk patio slap-dab on Broadway. His lease is our gain. For the first time you can eat, drink, and be merry right on this main drag. And there's nothing like scarfing lunch while you watch lawyers, tourists, and office workers hustle by in the morning sun. Lunch or dinner, start off with his home made soups, but the must-eat is his Spicy Santa Fe Chicken Salad — the magic's in the cranberries and Gorgonzola. Also great: BBQ chicken pizza. Lunch and dinner, Monday through Friday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/03)

New Leaf Restaurant Hilton Gaslamp Hotel, 401 K Street, Gaslamp, 619-702-8200. This hotel restaurant features American comfort food carried off with California flair and served in comfortable surroundings. Well-spaced oversized tables make this a good choice for business breakfasts and lunches. Outdoor seating options include an intimate patio lounge with a waist-high firepit that's lighted at night. Evenings, the atmosphere and garb tend toward the casual. Tortilla-crusted salmon is a stand-out entrée. Desserts are housemade and include a tasty New York cheesecake. Validated valet parking. Smart California wine list with rather high markups, plenty by the glass. Open three meals, seven days, until midnight on weekends. — *N.W.* (12/04) Rainwater's on Kettner 1202 Kettner Boulevard (at B Street), Little Italy, 619-233-5757. You could order the fish, the chicken, or even the lamb, but odds are vou're here because vou want steak. prepared by people who respect your enthusiasm and offer prime beef in multiple cuts. And you're here because Rainwater's is venerable and local. You can dine old-style and enjoy it - warm cornbread fingers, a fine loose-packed crab cake, a crisp, watery wedge of iceberg lettuce under a blue cheese blan-ket. As for the beef, New York strip takes the day. You actually have to chew it — it ain't filet — but every chomp gives up scads of flavor. Order a side of greaseless, firm-bodied onion rings and vash it down with something from the exhaustive (and expensive) wine list. Lunch Monday through Friday from 11:30 a.m.; dinner daily. Very expensive. — A.M. (6/03)

Shortstop's Grille at Tivoli Bar 505 Sixth Avenue (at Island), Gaslamp, 619-232-6754. Ever heard of the Stingaree, downtown's old red light district? The 1885 Tivoli is one of its last survivors, the oldest bar in the Gaslamp, and Wyatt Earp was its most famous customer. The only thing new is Shortstop's Grille, but "Shortstop" Paulie is an old hand at feeding roaring appetites. He's an ex-Alaska fishing boat cook. Best deal: the Tivoli Special, a 1/3-pound burger with a domestic beer included. Other good fillers: the "Shortstop" sandwich (bacon, egg, tomato, cheese, on grilled sourdough), the tuna salad sandwich with fries, and grilled breast of chicken sandwich with fise. Remember to toast Wyatt and his wife Josie. They're on the wall. Lunch and dinner, Monday to Saturday. — *E.B. (1/04)*

Star of the Sea 1360 North Harbor Drive (at Ash), downtown, 619-232-7408. Here you'll find sparkling-fresh seafood in creative California-style treatments with organic, locally farmed produce, along with a long, interesting wine list offering some wonderful off-beat whites at moderate prices (along with the expected, exorbitant Chardonnays). Light eaters on a budget could make a luxury meal of any pair of appetizers. A recent renovation has given every table a clear view of the bay, but the price exacted by all that glass is a raucous noise level when full. Go early in the week for relative quiet. Service is friendly and knowledgeable. Valet parking fee; street parking feasible in cooler months. Reservations needed — the joint is jumping. Dinner only, seven nights. Very expensive. — *N.W. SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

Bistro D'Asia 1301 Orange Avenue (at B Avenue), Coronado, 619-437-6677. The relaxing restaurant attached to the hardy "Lizard Lounge" serves gentled-down dishes from all over East Asia. Among the tastiest are delicate lemon shrimps, vegetarian "monk's curry," and ice creams from Mootown Creamery. Peking Duck is accorded the full service, with a waitress garnishing the table's first round of delicate "flower buns" with crackly duck skin, scallions, and hoisin sauce. Lizard Lounge next door now houses a sushi bar as well as a liquor bar. Reserve for weekend dinners. Street parking. Well-chosen wine list. Lunch and dinner daily. — *N.W. (11/04)*

Crown City Grille 926 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-5822. If you thought Coronado had only fat-cat eateries, think again — the area crawls with burrito joints, pizza joints, rice joints, and burger joints. Yet this new burgery is doing fine. It could be the sheer variety, but mainly it's that they've got the burger basics right. The bun's crisp, the meat's lean and, especially with the bleu cheese model, the taste is to die for. Owners Dave and Jeanne Evans say the pattie's always part sirloin, part New York cut. Also, the jalapeño-bacon cheeseburger is excellent, the Chicagostyle hot dog with "sport peppers" is hot and messy, and the Leclandic cod fish and chips is generously portioned and tasty. Plus, beer and wine. Breakfast, lunch, dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (5/03)*

Crown Room Hotel Del Coronado, 1500 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-6611. Let's face it, this is one of the grandest entrances you'll make anywhere, into the enormous, gloomy, vaulted timber dining room where presidents, princes and Marilyn Monroe have chowed down. It's only open for Sunday brunch these days. The gigantic eat-till-you're-beat buffet feast ranges from made-as-you-watch omelets to salmon, crab legs, prime rib, dizzying desserts, and even long-stemmed strawberries you hand-dip in chocolate. The downside? Monroe was here to shoot *Some Like It Hot*, but (apart from the chocolate hunk ones are delicious) or luke-warm (like prime rib and eggs Benedict — and those eggs could do with a lot more Benedict). But this is an Edwardian-scale social occasion — see

Lizard Lounge 1301 Orange Avenue (at B), Coronado, 619-437-6677. This venerable saloon, a Navy old-timers' favorite since the era when lounge lizards in leisure suits stalked the earth, now houses a good little sushi bar at one end of its spirits bar. The rice is well-seasoned, the seafood tastes sparkling-fresh, and each *nigiri* is given its own individual garnish (e.g., lemon with the *hamachi* roll). Most of the inside-out party rolls are variations of the California roll formula, with the same center of sweet crab and avocado, but there's also a lively mango-albacore roll, featuring tempura shrimp, avocado, and *ponzu*. For best seats and peaceful eating, come early; the bar fills fast and the room can get downright rowdy as the night rolls on. Street parking, Lunch/dinner daily. Moderate. — N.W. (11/04)

Lydia's Cafe and Nightclub 1628 Palm Avenue, San Diego, 619-429-3603. This easygoing dancing/eatery has a faithful following that goes back to 1957. But before you dance, eat! Check out the *birria en su jugo* (goat in its juices) with beans, rice, and tortillas, or enjoy filling snacks like *taquitos, cucaracha* (a corn tortilla stuffed with ham, cheese, and sour cream), or the snack Lydia says she invented: *botanas* (beans, pork, and melted cheese over corn chips). Open from early breakfast to early dinner Sunday through Wednesday, until midnight Thursday and Friday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

McP's Irish Pub & Grill 1107 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-5280. With a crowd ranging from Navy retirees to chic singles barely of drinking age, the perpetual party on McP's' patio is nurtured by above-average Irish-Mexican-American pub grub (burgers, potato skins, nachos, etc.). The Irish fare includes a pleasing Mulligan stew served in a hollowed bread-loaf, and an absolutely fabulous corned beef and cabbage plate, with tender, thick slices surrounding cabbage so young and sweet it ought to be carded. Good soups, too. Daytimes, try the hearty (and then some) Irish meat-fest breakfast. Open daily, standard pub hours. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

Primavera 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454. This standout in Coronado's culinary scene offers courtly charm and an impressive menu. Try their saffron risotto, clams bordelaise, or the delicious ossobuco, of which every detail is accomplished, admirable. From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number.

Cafe la Especial Avenida Revolu ción #718 (down the market steps), Tijuana, 685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American afi-cionados of Tijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros. Summer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-to-gringos ra-tio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to *carne asada* and *bistek ranchero*, from cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the steamed taco stand upstairs. That's still going too. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (5/02)*

El Faro de Mazatlan Boulevard Sánchez Taboada #9542, Plaza Fi-nanciera, Zona Río, Tijuana, 684-8882, 684-8883, or 684-2236. We're talking safe, reliable, middle-class fish-fare here. The "Lighthouse of Mazatlan" is bright, blue, and white with smart varnished wood furniture and delivers fish, lob ster, oyster, squid, and shrimp dishes that are easy to like. Generous free ap-petizers include marlin ceviche, fried fish, and fish albondigas soup. The interesting part is in trying dishes like the sea snail salad. (After a few closed-eye bites, it's delicious — like eating a sliced clam. It's great in a Caesar.) Look for original ways with octopus, pez espada (swordfish) and others. One of the sim-plest, best dishes: the cabicucho (Mexican seabass), charbroiled but moist and really better without its ranchero sauce. Open daily for lunch and dinner. - E.B. (6/05) Moderate -

El Rodeo Boulevard Salinas #1647, Tijuana, 686-5640. This 30-year-old steak haven sits on traffic-drowned Sali-nas, but climb onto its porch and you're at some Sonoran desert rancho, saguaro cacti and all. Inside it's dark wood and brick, wagon wheels, lariats, rifles, longhorns, and generous amounts of cattle-ranch food. Entrée price includes a delicious soup of roast beef juices. beans cooked in their own juices, a que-sadilla, a salad, two *botana* (snack) plates, of, say, vinegary veggies and pota-toes, and a beef liver medley, flour tortillas, chips, and hot sauce. You can get any cut of steak you want. A *parrillada* — BBQ dish — gives you marinated beef rib, *carne asada*, and barbecued chicken, all sizzling on a rancho-style metal tabletop grill that glows with hot coals. Best part: the roasted spring onions splayed across the meat. Dessert and coffee also included. Good place for a party. Open 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. – E.B. (5/05)

La Baguette Blvd. Lázaro Cárdenas #1030 (a.k.a. Blvd. Costero, opposite Sanborn's between Castillo and Blancarte), Ensenada, 646-178-2814, For those who take their java straight and strong, this is a good stop for a quick continental breakfast or dessert, with quite possibly the best French Roast coffee in town. Open daily during the day. Inexpensive. -N.W. (4/03)

La Escondida Santa Monica #1 (in Fraccionamiento Las Palmas), Tijuana 681-4458. This hidden ("escondida") mansion has been a restaurant for three decades. The terrazzo and garden overlooking the Tijuana River valley make breakfast and dinners a treat. House specialties are more interesting than the reg-ular fare. Try the seafood casserole (cacerola de mariscos), the tambor (a dish of layered beef, cheese, and pork), or the roasted baby Monterrey goat (*"cabrito tatemado"*). Desserts include the house *especial*, mango and ice cream with rompope (Mexican egg nog), and crepas de cajeta con nieve, crêpes with walnuts green pistachio ice cream, and "burnt milk" caramel sauce — the nearest thing to liquid fudge this side of paradise. On weekends the place rocks with parties and live music. The big downside: It's hard to find. Take Agua Caliente Boulevard one half mile past the racetrack, turn right at Las Palmas, then left at the *"Rey del Pollo"* sign. The *La Escondida* entrance sign is in red neon at the road's end. 

here are new films in town from the respective directors of *City* of *God* and *Oldboy*, Fernando Meirelles and Chan-wook Park, or more exactly a new one from the director of *City of God* and an older

one from the director of *Oldboy*. Inasmuch as both those titles stirred up considerable excitement, I expect that a

number of moviegoers will be more excited about these new arrivals than I was, and yet (if this won't discourage them) I admit I enjoyed both of the directors' current releases more than their prior.

The Constant Gardener, marching under the pre-emptive banner of A Potboiler Production, is an adaptation of a John le Carré suspense novel (one I haven't read), and is a long stride for Meirelles from the slums of Rio de Janeiro. But not as long, quite, as the leap of his countryman, Walter Salles, from *The Motorcycle Diaries* to *Dark Water* — from politically engagé to supernaturally engulfed. Le Carré has always had an elevated social consciousness, and a missionary zeal to match, and so the stretch for the Brazilian is largely geographical: to Kenya, where a multinational pharmaceutical company is using the natives as unwitting guinea pigs, or sacrificial lambs, for an experi-

mental drug called Dypraxa. The spectator will require only the slightest touch of paranoia, or slightest taste

for the paranoia genre, to find this premise credible. He will face a stiffer challenge to find it cinematic. Vague on particulars, slow in progress, thick in texture, the film follows a course of knowingness rather than "showingness." (Normal modus operandi for conspiracy theorists, who for a reason are not known as conspiracy exposers.) And the jiggle and jump in the visual style, though tempered a bit from *City of God*, can drum up little excitement on their own.

Many a filmmaker before Meirelles, like many a casual reader, has failed to locate the thrills in a le Carré thriller. Nevertheless, this one holds plenty of appeal as a love story, one which we know from the outset is to be an unhappy one.





cinematic of these) *The Little Drummer Girl*, a gooey sentimentalist lurks within the sourball.

Sympathy for Mr. Vengeance, a year older than Oldboy, is part one of Chanwook Park's so-called "revenge trilogy," three tales unconnected other than by theme, with part three of the cycle, Sympathy for Lady Vengeance, already completed but still to come. We oughtn't to be kept waiting for that part any longer than the four months we have had to wait between parts two and one. The latter, postponing the thread of revenge until well underway, seems at first to be weaving the story of a kidnapping gone bad. "There are good kidnappings," asserts one of the schemers, "and bad kidnappings," and the present one had every intention of being a good one, a philanthropic fund-raiser to finance a lifesaving kidney operation for the sister of the turquoisehaired, deaf-mute mastermind. It goes bad, just the same, and then goes worse, in unpredictable and irreparable ways. The Korean filmmaker, on this showing, is a precisionist, a deadpan wit, an intermittent brute, and an ambiguous moralist. He is also a slowpoke. The twisty plot, while not without its improbabilities, has fewer of them, and smaller ones, than Oldboy: and the violence, while strong, is at least a little more restrained; and there is nothing at all to equate with the Fear Factor stunt of wolfing down a live octopus. These losses, as they will be viewed by some, will appear to others as gains. To me, for instance. And the image is cleaner, fresher, generally healthier to boot. Be aware, though, that the scheduled week at the Ken starting Friday, while not reduced in days, has been cut back to a single screening nightly, at 9:35. Which tells you something about the expected audience. Bloodsuckers only.

David Mackenzie's Asylum is not noticeably a step up from his Young Adam, nor a significant step removed from its era of repression, the late Fifties. The discontented and dangerously idle wife (Natasha Richardson) of a buttoned-down madhouse director (Hugh Bonneville) starts up a sort of Lady Chatterley thing with a dark, sweaty, lowborn wife killer and former sculptor (Marton Csokas) at work on the grounds. (Sometimes a tool is not just a tool.) Apart from a mildly shocking turn near the finish, the unfoldment seems rather over-obvious and overcalculated for a case of l'amour fou. The period cars, hats, dresses, and such, are enjoyable, even so; and the photography is crisp and clear; and Ian McKellen is properly smarmy as a manipulative psychiatrist who controls fewer puppet-strings than he'd like.

Tony Takitani, down to the final day of its week at the Ken, is somewhere around the fourteenth feature film of Jun Ichikawa, and the first to surface around here. No progress report will be possible. The source material is a story by Haruki Murakami, and its transition to the screen does not look to have been an easy one, never shaking loose from the omniscient third-person narrator. (At times the characters themselves will fill in the narrator's thoughts as if they were dialogue, a curious effect.) Unrolling almost in the form of a panorama, with the camera gliding left to right from one scene to the next, it tells of a man who is first attracted to a woman by her clothes ("She wore her clothes naturally," the narrator expounds, "as though enveloped by a special breeze"), then repulsed by her spendthrift obsession

with them after their marriage, then left with a cavernous closetful of them after her death. The idea, teased out to a long, slow hour and a quarter, has a certain parable-like potency, but not enough to fight through the oatmealgray image (unflattering to the clothes), the monotonous musing piano, and the insistent wistful narrator. A running time of an hour and a quarter, however, deserves to be commended in itself, whether for the purpose of sustaining speed, as in *Red Eye*, or, as here, limiting tedium. ■

MOVIE LISTINGS

The Aristocrats — Paul Provenza's talking-heads film rounds up a herd of wellknown and less-known comedians to tell and to analyze an old gray blue joke, the punch line of which is the film's title. (Alternate and not-as-good punch lines: the Sophisticates, the Debonairs.) The joke seems to be something of a private joke among comedians, seldom told in public out of common decency. It has an unassailable structure, a solid beginning and end, and a lot of room in the middle for extended jazzlike improvisation, often on motifs of incest, bestiality, bodily waste. The set form allows the audience reasonably to gauge who goes "too far," which turns out to be less a question of taste than a question of comprehension, a question of intelligence. Howie Mandel and Bob Saget step up as the top competitors for the worst — most uncomprehending, least intelligent - rendition, with Saget getting the edge by laughing repeatedly at his own idocy. George Carlin makes the most sensible contributions as an analyst. And Kevin Pollak earns perhaps the biggest laughs, or anyway the most guiltless laughs, with a totally irrelevant impression of Christopher Walken. Other jokes, not all of them blue, some of them variations on or inversions of the central joke, get told as well. The central one, as much as it's a dirty joke, is also a dated joke, a quaint joke, smelling of the musty trunk of vaudeville, dulled a bit by the liberated heirs of Lenny Bruce. Taboos today are in short supply. Yet — in what appears to have been the inspiration for the film - the joke got revived and revitalized in the post-9/11 gloom, when a defiant Gilbert Gottfried chose to tell it for a televised Friars Club roast of Hugh Hefner, finding a new or a forgotten meaning in it. "Inspiration," in that context, is not too lofty a word. Gottfried's rendition, plucked from the archives, emerges as hands-down the best and bravest. Overlong for the task at hand, stretched out at a few ticks under ninety minutes, ghastly to look at, the film nonetheless meets the mandate of a documentary in the most fundamental sense. Batman Begins — With a new director (Christopher Nolan) and a new star (Christian Bale), the fifth entry in the Batman series, true to its title, returns to square one: how and why Bruce Wayne came to be Batman; the psychological root of his fixation on flying mammals; the part this played in his guilt over his parents' murder; in short, the logic, the reasoning, behind the selection of his chiropteran crime-fighting persona. Think of it, more exactly, as *Batman Starts Over* or *Batman Backs Up*. Think of it, in other words, as a prequel. The starting-over will naturally mean that the storytelling takes a good long time to get to the Batsuit, the Batcave, the Batmobile, and all the appurtenances. But the starting-over also means, not so naturally, a new intensity, a new purpose, a new attitude, a straighter face. All this intensity, etc., cuts two ways: it lends a degree of conviction to the goings-on, and yet it risks looking ridiculous once it runs into the Batsuit, the Batcave, etc. Can an air of seriousness feasibly be sustained? (For all his lack of superpowers, the hero floats through the air with the ease of Spider-Man if not Superman.) To help sustain that air a bit further, there is no jokey villain this time (notwithstanding a forward-looking nod to the Joker at the fadeout), but rather an apocalyptic criminal plot, fully worthy of a Fu Manchu, to do to Gotham what God did to Sodom and Gomorrah, and for similar reasons. And the nightmarish visions evoked by a "weaponized hallucinogen" (a sign of the times, a salute to Al Qaeda) are genuinely scary. On balance, the two-way cutting goes deeper in the direction of conviction than in that of ridiculousness. With Katie Holmes, Michael Caine, Morgan Freeman, Gary Oldman, Liam Neeson, Cillian Murphy, Tom Wilkinson, Rutger Hauer. 2005. ★★ (MISSION VALLEY 20; VOGUE) **Broken Flowers** — Jim Jarmusch's mainstreamiest film to date has a lot of laughs in it, despite the pretentiousness of the *cinéma d'ennui* pacing and deliberately dissatisfying ending. Laughs are laughs, nonetheless, and once they've fought through the pretentiousness, they cannot be wiped off the scoreboard. (Another impediment to be fought through, another potential wet blanket, is an image a shade or two dark and dreary.) The idea of the film is a simple one and an immediately appealing one. We start with "an over-the-hill Don Juan" (words of a huffily departing





girlfriend) who receives an unsigned typewritten letter from a former lover, informing him that he has a nineteen-year-old son bent on tracking him down. At the urging of his mystery-buff neighbor (an unlikely neighbor in so swanky a suburb, a West Indian family man with three menial jobs and more than that many children), he draws up a list of possible suspects from the perti-nent time period — a list of five, one now deceased, scattered across the country, as revealed through a search of the Internet and sets out to track them down, pre-emptively, and to smoke out the source of the letter. The itinerary of our amateur sleuth leads to a broad spectrum of people and places, and in between, to some invigorating on-the-road shots through a rental-car windshield. Put more pretentiously, it adds up to a tour of Paths Not Taken, a graph of Life's Changes. With only a little effort, we can imagine Woody Allen coming up with such an idea and going to town with it. We cannot quite imagine, these days, that the idea would have turned out this funny; that he would actually have gotten anywhere near to town with it. The deadpan detachment of Bill Murray, a minimal reactor, a frosty mirror, a cautious counterpuncher, makes a perfect match for that of his direc

tor; and the humor, sprouting out of the gaps, the schisms, the chasms between peo ple, comes through as less strained, or less buried under pretension, than normal for Jarmusch. You are free, once the closing credits are rolling, to pursue the mystery into the trackless recesses of the human heart, the enigmatic ego, the predestined identity. When they are recruited by the occupying French army, however, to investigate a case of missing children (a Red Riding Hood, a Hansel and Gretel), they encounter an au-thentic Enchanted Forest and Wicked Witch, thereby diminishing their future tales of imagination to straight reportage. Terry Gilliam's production is characteristically heavy and indigestible, and his photography comes in arbitrary shades of monochrome: fire orange, ash gray, clay red, dirt brown. With Matt Damon, Heath

Charlie and the Chocolate

Factory — Tim Burton's consolation prize for losing out on the Lemony Snicket concession (surely that had his name written on it) is a remake of the fractured fairy tale by Roald Dahl, a spindly little framework freighted with production values, CG imagery, and dark dense bordello color, like some scrawny four-foot scrub of a Christmas tree adorned with enough ornaments, lights, and tinsel for Rockefeller Center. (Proposed name change: Tim Burden.) The plot premise seems to combine the theme park and the reality show: an elimination game in Candy Land. Five lucky children, all of them horrid but one, win an opportunity to tour Willy Wonka's top-secret chocolate factory, in competition for an unspecified Grand Prize. Every time one of the horrid ones is bounced out (by some nonlethal but nauseating method), a chorus line of Munchkin-like midgets known as the Oompa Loompas comes out and does a musical number, combining Busby Berkeley and David Lynch. Further combinations: the reclusive chocolatier, in Johnny Depp's peculiar rendition, combines Mr. Rogers (mincing cadence) and Michael Jackson (pancake makeup), among others; and the titular little hero, the truly adorable Freddie Highmore, who played opposite Depp in Finding Neverland as well, combines Tiny Tim (poverty-line pathos) and perhaps Frodo the Hobbit (rodenty cuteness). All of these combinations and others (the "teleportation" of a candy bar into a TV set combines 2001 and The Flv, more



specifically the sixtieth humorous usage of the opening notes of Also Sprach Zarathus*tra* and the fortieth humorous usage of a high-pitched "Help me!") pile up, two by two, to produce an unsubsiding groan, arising either from the overtaxed framework or the overtaxed viewer. Four Brothers — The titular quartet, all adopted, all acknowledged "fuck-ups," are of two races, evenly divided, black and white, and reunited for the Turkey Day funeral of their sainted mother, murdered in the course of a liquor-store holdup. "I did-n't come back here for the funeral," explains the Mark Wahlberg one, making clear right off the bat that this is to be a tale of revenge, a pursuit undertaken with a singular lack of strategy and diplomacy. (Key investigative tools: a gallon of gasoline and a cigarette lighter.) The Detroit setting opens the skies to a storm of Motowr Marvin Gaye, The Temptations, The Four



Tops - and the time of year opens them additionally to as much snow as in the relocated remake of Assault on Precinct 13, even to the point of engulfing the white-crowned Paramount mountain in the opening logo. Major assets, let's count them, are multiple: unselfconscious and unselfcongratulatory racial togetherness (to get the redeeming social merit out of the way first); a hurtling pace, albeit a bit lurching, leaping, and bumping; crisp photography; tangy dialogue ("You don't pay a whore to fuck you. You pay her to leave"); hellacious action, slickly staged by director John Singleton, most particularly the siege of the family home by ski-masked machine gunners, a sort of pocket edition of the aforementioned Assault on Precinct 13; and a vigorous villain, played against type by Chiwetel Ejiofor (the sweetly sympathetic figure of Dirty Pretty Things and Melinda and Melinda, every bit as sharp a turnaround as Jeffrey Wright's villain in Singleton's Shaft), who acquits himself well in the climactic mano-a-mano on the ice, bouncing on his toes in the float-like-a-butterfly style of Muhammad Ali. Bully he may be; chicken he isn't. On the other side of the scales, causing momentary teeters here and there, would be the air of utter unreality, such that the cops will be content to cart away the bodies in the street without even check ing to see the survivors' gun permits. 

The Great Raid — True story of a U.S. Ranger assault on a POW camp in the Philippines toward the end of the Second World War, though the first-person narrator, the leader of the assault, starts back a bit further: "In 1941 the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor...." John Dahl, the director, had had trouble enough coping with the bare-bones neo-noirs of Kill Me Again, Red Rock West, and The Last Seduction, and whatever skills he honed in that workshop are pretty well worn down on this grander scale: a three-ring circus that jumps back and forth between the arenas of the POWs, the Rangers, and the Filipino resistance. The initial overrating of the *noirs*, however, means that auteur-hungry critics will continue to go the extra mile to hunt down a laurel or two. To get there, they must pass through many miles of straightness, flatness, dullness, and corn, in the company of cardboard characters and second-tier actors (James Franco, Benjamin Bratt, Joseph Fiennes, and lessers). The sun-washed color, a step away from sepia, appears to be an attempt to impart a newsreel reality, but the actual newsreel footage of liberated POWs and their liberators throughout the closing credits makes you feel a little like James Agee, forever brandishing wartime docu-

mentaries as a club against the prettifications of Hollywood. That sort of tactic might have been ruled (even in Agee's day) inadmissible, had the filmmakers themselves not introduced the footage in evidence. Connie Nielsen, Marton Csokas, Mark Consuelos. 2005.

Grizzly Man — The globe-trotting Werner Herzog digs up another of those border dwellers, those boundary pushers, he loves to document - one Timothy Treadwell, b. 1957, d. 2003 — along with a hundred or so hours of found footage, a treasure trove of video shot by the subject himself, mostly *of* himself, to record his years in the wilderness living among Alaskan bears, capped off with an audio recording of his own death, plus his girl-friend's death, at the paws of one of those bears. ("Capped off" might not be the way to put it: he evidently didn't have time to take the lens cap off the camcorder.) Herzog neatly organizes the material into a portrait of a man who at first glance seems simply an ecological eccentric, with more than a little presentiment of his fate ("They can kill, they can bite, they can decapitate"), but a man who, at a longer look, turns into something of a self-mythologizing monomaniac. The filmmaker, in his own footage, gathers testimony from those who knew the man ("He tended to want to become a bear"), and he captures at least a couple of priceless moments: the coroner

handing over to one of Treadwell's former girlfriends the still-ticking wristwatch taken from his detached arm, and his mother reminiscing about him, in the comfort of her home in Florida, with his favorite teddy bear perched on her lap. Herzog is not shy about adding his own observations in his familiar feverish idiom and his expectorating delivery ("I discovered a film of human ecstasies and darkest inner turmoil"), nor about taking an editorial stance at variance with his subject: "I believe the common denominator of the universe is chaos, disharmony, and murder." Treadwell, in proof of Herzog's point, is in no condition to present a rebuttal to that. 2005. ★★★ (FLOWER HILL 4; LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

Happy Endings — Three interwoven plotlines with occasional points of intersection, one of them to do with the tested friendship between homosexual couples of opposite sexes, one to do with the boatrocking new female lead singer of a garage band, and one to do with a wannabe docu mentary filmmaker who focuses his camcorder on a Mexican immigrant sex worker. Children feature prominently in each line, not as actual presences, but as life choices, abstract concepts: the sperm-bank baby, the aborted baby, the adopted baby. The entire cast of characters, however widely scattered, comes together in a fan tasy finale reminiscent of Places in the Heart or Fellini's 8>1/2. Despite that stab at magnanimity, the film doesn't really amount to much, though it whiles away a couple of hours. Writer-director Don Roos keeps the tone on the light side, the glib side, the superficial side, the self-conscious and posturing side. His principal tone-setting device is the intermittent split-screen title card, dispensing silent narration in the omniscient third person, an uncommonly



chatty, catty third person, omniscient into the future in addition to the past, telling us, for instance, that so-and-so has had sex with twelve women since his wife died and *will have* sex with two more before he himself dies. Verbatim prose samples: "She's not dead. No one dies in this movie. It's a comedy, sort of" and "Charley is now gay. Who isn't?" and "Nicky never lies. He's not her son, if that's what you're thinking." Apparently intended to be ingratiating but more apt to be just grating, these bring to mind the old *Saturday Night Live* gimmick of picking out an audience member with the camera and captioning the image with some potential embarrassment such as "Has hemorrhoids" or "President of the Olivia Newton-John Fan Club." The Island — The beginning takes place in the vicinity of an Orwellian dystopia, where a closely monitored populace ("Sodium Excess Detected," reads out a urinal at a morning pee) must live in regimented drudgery and sterile isolation, un-

der stricter rules against intergender "proximity" than at a Catholic-school dance, and with the desperate hope to hit the lottery and a free pass to the titular paradise, "nature's last remaining pathogen-free zone." Roughly forty-five minutes into the movie, the Island will turn out to be, along with much else, a mirage, a figment. Further revelations trickle out, but the main business of the next hour and a half is a chase, in gaudy music-video visuals, with low angles and wide angles, flash pans and smash cuts, shafts of light and blasts of glare, plumes of

Her blockhead brother-in-law doesn't take kindly to her efforts to help him with his paper on Huckleberry Finn ("Did you think it was funny?" "No, I thought it was long"), and her mother-in-law sizes her up as all wrong ("She's too pretty, she's too smart, and that's a deadly combination"), and her father-in-law keeps himself to himself. Only the kin by marriage, a non-sequitur motormouth nine months pregnant, lays out the welcome mat: a showy role for Amy Adams, if a tad condescending, a hand-me-down Dixie ditz. The first feature of Phil Morrison exhibits several of the most basic "indie" indicators: a milky, diluted image; too-quiet, unatmospheric sound; a character-driven storvline that's more drifting than actually driven. There's a nice scene at the church social when the interloper finds out, to her amazement, that her husband is prized for his hymn singing, but there's no followup to it, not so much as a what-the-hell. Mad Hot Ballroom — Marilyn Agrelo's documentary on New York City fifthgraders who've been channeled into the stay-off-the-streets-and-stay-out-of-trouble activity of competitive ballroom dancing: "I see them turning into these ladies and gentlemen," one teacher manages to say while fighting back tears. We follow three disparate classes (only one of which will make it through to the citywide finals: "I still really don't understand what happened," a dejected curly top buttonholes the emcee at the quarterfinals, after his team falls three points short), and we follow them with an almost parental tunnel vision: we cannot really judge the competition; we have eyes only for "ours." Kids being kids, however, with no pumped-up heroes or villains (beyond a troublesome student named Jonathan, whose troubles go uninvestigated), this is an easy-to-like film with an easy-to-overlook fuzzy video image. 2005. ★★ (GASLAMP 15)

Me and You and Everyone We Know — Quirky comedy, without question, but quirkiness these days is no scarcer than shark's teeth, and it becomes neces sary to distinguish between the pointlessly quirky and the pointedly. The issue still teeters in the balance when, for instance, a scraggly, trashy-looking white male, kicked out of the house by his black wife, says goodbye to his two café-au-lait children by setting his hand on fire outside their bedroom window. It has irreversibly tipped to the good, however, by the time a female driver of an Elder Cab, squiring a shut-in oldster to the shoe store to purchase a pair of neon blue Nikes, spies a goldfish in a plastic bag forgotten atop the car in front of her, is thereupon overcome by sentiments of sadness and helplessness over the fish's inevitable fate, yet feels honor-bound to ac company it to the end. You know right then that you're in the presence of a hyper-sensitive, a highly individual, and yes, a quirky vision, at once acute and tender. The vision would be that of the multimedia performance artist and first-time feature filmmaker Miranda July, who is an object of vision, herself, in the pivotal role of the moonlighting cab driver and, incidentally, aspiring multimedia performance artist, a figure redolent of insecurity and determination, pain and perseverance. Character interest is spread democratically among an assortment of oddballs, but centers on the wary mating dance between this cabbie and the scraggly hand-burner (John Hawkes), a sadsack shoe salesman for whom she has unaccountably set her cap. The separateness, the strangeness, the unknownness of people are subjects close to the crosshairs of

the filmmaker's vision. Even closer to dead center are the fundamental elements of hope and improbability in any romantic overture. The quirkiness of the thing, though it feels as if drawn from reality and not imposed by force, is nevertheless a kind of tunnel vision. 2005. ★★★ (HORTON PLAZA 14)

Star Wars, Episode III: Revenge of the Sith — George Lucas closes the circle the last of the three prequels, evenly spaced out at three-year intervals. (The film-maker's latter-day visual style comes back to us in a twinkling: the flatness of the humans and the overfertilized fluorescence of their computer-generated surroundings, something like sticks of wood in a stop-mo tion tomato patch.) Anakin Skywalker, as we all are aware ahead of time, is on course to explore the Dark Side of the Force, his personal Darth side, "motivated" by his im-

palpable passion for Padmé, the Senator formerly known as Queen, and by his premonitions of her death in childbirth. Looking more and more like Uma Thurman (pupils floating upwards) and talking more and more like Ryan Phillippe (pouty lips over tight jaw), the leading man, Hayden Christensen, appears to plumb the depths of darkness about as far as a college sophomore facing a term-paper deadline when he'd really rather be chugalugging beer. It's true that he has a hand in a lot of carnage (personally dispatching a roomful of 'younglings," sentimental overkill reminiscent of the slaughter of Macduff's family in Macbeth), yet the dire warnings of the film's unsuitability for children seem a bit off base. Surely it's more suitable for them than it is for adults. Lucas's obsessive castration symbolism (a fear bordering on

hysteria) may be over their heads, but on the other hand they will be less likely to carp at the murky exposition of the faux-Shakespearean political skulduggery, more likely to sit there in contented incomprehension, inasmuch as the murkiness, thick though it is, fails in the slightest to obscure the goodness of the good guys and the badness of the bad. So clear is this separation that Anakin's change of allegiance - Jedi selflessness for Sithian selfhood — reduces him to a dupe at best and a loon at worst. And, in the midst of what looks to be an erupting volcano, his climactic lightsaber duel with his mentor leaves him quite literally diminished in stature (or symbolically, once again, castrated). Though he gets propped up afterwards in the operating room, he comes out of it as a sort of Wizard of Oz with the curtain thrown back. Ewan

2046 — After the concentrated perfection of "The Hand" — Wong Kar-wai's fraction of the anthology film, Eros - the defects of this one are apt to appear the more glaring. Ostensibly it's a sequel to his close-to-perfection In the Mood for Love. Or anyhow the action picks up shortly after it in 1966, and centers around the same protagonist (Tony Leung), although the love-'em-and-leave 'em libertine and spicy science-fiction writer of the current film bears little resemblance to the inhibited piner and Grub Street drudge of its predecessor, even allowing for the ravages of a broken heart. (The title refers both to the time-setting of his s-f tales and to the number of his next-door hotel room.) There is a patchwork feeling here, jammed and jumbled, diffuse and desultory, partly the effect of a fragmented narrative and a heavy dependence on the cement of voice-over, and partly the effect



of a visual grab-bag that includes a lot of slow-motion, a bit of black-and-white, and extended re-enactments of the hero's visions of the future, sometimes animated, sometimes live-action, always in an illustrational style that postdates the science fiction of the mid-Sixties. The director's painterly eve ensures, at the same time, a great deal of beauty; and the wide, wide screen affords him more room than ever before for empty space, out-of-focus space, purely compositional and coloristic space. This thing of beauty, though, is rather a scatterbrained

beauty, a gorgeous space case. Some hefty ideas, to do with impermanence, loss, memory, alienation, are lugged up and down the arduous stair-step structure: we skip quickly past the characters played by Gong Li, Carina Lau, and Faye Wong, be fore we spend some quality time with Zhang Ziyi, and begin to work our way back, in reverse order, to Faye Wong (still going forward in chronology) and then (withdrawing into the past) Carina Lau and Gong Li. With small overlaps, the scheme goes more or less A-B-C-D-C-B-A. We can

almost perceive that the top step - the peak of the pyramid — the Zhang Ziyi piece — might have attained the independent perfection of "The Hand," if held to similar length. The lower steps are stubbier, and slipperier. And where the Antonioni and Soderbergh fractions dragged down Eros, Wong manages to drag down 2046 all by himself. 2005. ★★ (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

It assumes a degree of grounding in the history, and the cinema, of the Battle of Britain and the French Resistance. The alien-invasion subgenre, as everyone now knows, blossomed during the Cold War, fertilized by fears of Communist takeover; and it's quite reasonable, quite knowledgeable, to deduce that 9/11 and its aftermath could dump some fresh manure in the field. Spielberg makes damn good and sure that no one will miss the relevance: the "sleeper cells" hidden beneath American streets; the hero's coat of ashes fabricated from his incinerated fellow citizens: the shower of clothes from the sky; the bulletin board of the "missing"; and of course the natural question in the first confusion, "Is it the terrorists?" All of that seems legitimate enough. This is a serious film in a way that Independence Day, merrily blowing up the White House so few years earlier, didn't

need to be, want to be, or pretend to be. There's something of an air of penitence in Spielberg's choice at this time to do an anti-*Close Encounters*, an anti-*E*.*T*. Or if not quite penitence, then a reappraisal, a caveat. He would appear to have seen a new light. And if his conversion falls short of total renunciation, it at least infuses him with a new zeal. Still, the decision to re-do the seminal alien-invasion story, rather than to do a new one, tends to raise the familiar specter of Spielbergian arrogance. In spite of the gracious gran-and-gramps cameos for Gene Barry and Ann Robinson, the two stars of the commendable 1953 treatment of the novel, there is the inescapable implication that that version didn't have the wherewithal to do the job right. No matter how eye-popping Spielberg's special effects may be, no matter how much "improved" over those of a half-century ago, we are at every turn confronted by his belief in the almighty dollar, his infatuation with size, his complacent certainty that bigger is always better, and his dependence on mere loudness and suddenness to elicit a response from his audience. And his trusty old device of the temporary death, the takesy-backsy death, the just-fooling death, would indicate that his penitence for E.T. lacks a little something in sincerity. Wedding Crashers — It starts out as a men-behaving-badly skit about a couple of skirt-chasing cads who drop in on weddings to pick up susceptible girls and promptly drop them. After a frenetic montage of their modus operandi, however, the action settles into a perfectly conventional romantic comedy, hitting all the expected spots at all the expected times, as our two cads — the equally expected Vince Vaughn and Owen Wilson, who earlier worked with the director, David Dobkin, on *Clay Pigeons* and Shanghai Knights respectively — discover their true soul mates, two sisters for added convenience, a phony virgin slash nympho maniac slash bondage girl (Isla Fisher) and a save-the-planet altruist (Rachel McAdams) who reveals her superior sensibility by giggling uncontrollably at the self-written vows of their older sister and new brother-in-law. The funny business, in what amounts merely to a newer convention, is pushed to such extremes of crassness and grossness that you feel as if the laughs are being extracted not by feather tickler but by thumbscrew. E.g., the ancient matriarch of one of America's leading political families will pepper her dinner-party conversation with epithets like "asshole," "homo" (of her own grandson), and "rug muncher" (of Eleanor Roosevelt), while her granddaughter administers a hand job beneath the tablecloth. Audiences do laugh at this sort of thing. But why? With Christopher Walken, Jane Seymour, Will Ferrell. 2005.

LEAD STORY

- Even though India now has 80,000 licensed dentists, nearly 100 "street dentists" continue to operate in dusty, open-air "offices," performing extractions and "fitting" used dentures for, typically, 1 percent to 2 percent of what a licensed dentist would charge. One patient of practitioner Mahender Singh, observed for a June dispatch from Jaipur in the New York Times, was "spitting streams of blood into the gutter" after removal of an incisor that, said Singh, "was not working right" and "kept turning left and right when he ate." Singh uses anesthetic but said some patients still pass out from the pain.

Cultural Diversity

 A French bus line filed an unfair-competition lawsuit against a group of cleaning ladies in Moselle, who used to be customers but who recently began car-pooling to their jobs across the border at European Union offices in Luxembourg. Transports Schiocchet Excursions wants the ladies fined and their cars confiscated. ... In Tokyo in July, a group of French-language schoolteachers filed a lawsuit against the city's governor (asking the equivalent of almost \$100,000) for his having denigrated the French language, calling it a "failed international language." Said Malik Berkane, head of a French school in Tokyo, "[I]t's unacceptable for him to insult French in this way."

- In Kyrgyzstan (and some neighboring Central Asian countries) the pre-12th-century tribal custom of "ala kachuu" continues, in which a man reduces the time and expense of courtship by riding up on horseback to a woman, snatching her up, and taking her to his family home, where his relatives (and sometimes hers) prepare her for marriage. According to an April New York Times dispatch from Bishkek, more than half of wives are acquired by ala kachuu (although the term can also mean a more-benign "elope-

ment"), and even some of the snatched wives eventually "consent" to the marriage. Ala kachuu has been illegal for years, but the law against it is rarely enforced.

Questionable Judgments

- First prize in the youth division of the Fourth of July parade this year in Haines, Ore., went to three kids, aged nine and ten, who dressed as large, shelled insects (actually, in inner tubes covered by garbage bags), pushing huge rubber balls coated in sand, dirt, and dead grass, according to the Baker City Herald. (Yes, the parents had conspired with their kids to dress them up as dung beetles!)

- The Living Word Tabernacle in Waverly, Ohio, terminated the membership of Loretta Davis recently, according to a July report by WCMH-TV in Columbus, because she had stopped paying her tithe. Davis' contributions ended in January after she was hospitalized the first of 15 times this year for congestive heart failure. The church's founder said non-member Davis could still attend, but Davis' daughter said, "In the time of [her] need, [the church] should be caring, supporting, asking what she needs, help her if she needed help." (When healthier, Davis was donating \$60 a month out of her \$592 Social Security check.)

Recurring Themes

- Incompetent Home Improvement: A beeplagued homeowner in northwest Tucson, Ariz., attempting to "frighten the bees off" (according to a fire department spokesman) by lighting a small fire in the attic, inadvertently ignited insecticide vapor, with the resulting blaze causing about \$100,000 damage to the roof (March). ... A woman in Mecklenburg County, N.C., attempted to chase snakes out of a couch on her front porch by dousing the nest with lighter fluid, but then an accidentally dropped match set a fire large enough that she had to jump out a window to safety (June). - Fetish du Jour: In July in Exeter, England,

Paul Pennington pleaded guilty to engaging in sexual activity in a public restroom while dressed in a baby diaper, bib, and girl's dress and carrying a baby bottle (but also wearing a stuffed bra). Sean Kelly, 35, was arrested in Sebastian, Fla., in July, and charged with fraudulently attempting to obtain health-care services after he showed up at a clinic complaining of back pain but dressed in a baby diaper (which he eventually "loaded" and demanded a change). ... Calvin Milo Alvarez, 30, was arrested in Favetteville, Ark., in May on a child-pornography charge after he was found by police arguing with another man at an apartment house, with Alvarez dressed in a baby diaper and bleeding from the mouth.

Latest Religious Messages

- Britain's Church Mission Society, with 200 missionaries around the world, decided recently that a place that needs a missionary the most is the town of Telford, England (population 150,000), where fewer than one in a hundred residents attends an Anglican church. (Said a CMS spokesman, "These days the CMS goes to the hard places and takes on the hard cases.") (The Church of England might have a larger problem, according to a July survey by Bangor University researchers: 3 percent of its clergy doubts the existence of God, which works out to nearly 300 nonbelieving ministers.)

- A growing number of historical sites in Mecca (perhaps even including the home of the Prophet Muhammad) may soon fall to urban renewal as developers plan skyscrapers with stores and condominiums, according to a July Reuters dispatch. (Ironically, many devout Wahhabi Muslims support the demolition, hoping to prevent people from worshipping such "sacred" buildings instead of concentrating on their proper duties in Islam. Those Wahhabis view only the Grand Mosque, which is the destination for the annual hajj pilgrimages, as untouchable.)

- The New Born Fellowship Christian Center in Rochester, N.Y., recently adopted a severalweeks-long "Spiritual Warfare" theme that featured its pastor, Warren Meeks, delivering sermons while in military fatigues (and asking congregants to wear fatigues, too), to battle the spirits opposing U.S. troops overseas and those challenging American youth with drugs and gangs. Meeks also brought in an Army missile, to help with the message, according to a report on WHAM-TV.

First Things First

In June, the Arab Balad party went to court in Haifa, Israel, challenging ultra-nationalist Jews of the Gush Katif settlement, who are virulently opposing the government's mandatory withdrawal from Gaza. However, the Balads' complaint has little to do with sovereignty or religion. The party has for years used orange as its organizing theme color and filed the lawsuit to make the upstart Gush Katif stop using orange in its own materials.

Thinning the Herd

- The bodies of Kentucky State Reformatory inmates Avery C. Roland, 26, and Michael Talbot Ir., 24, were found in a nearby landfill the day after they went missing in July. A Department of Corrections official said they had probably hidden inside a garbage truck without realizing that, to prevent escapes, the prison requires that garbage be compacted twice before it leaves the grounds. ... Four days apart in July, two 19-year-old men (in Sheboygan, Wis., and Louisville, Ky.) fell to their deaths while car-surfing at high speeds. (According to a witness, the Sheboygan man's fatal fall came shortly after he yelled to his driver, "Is that all you got?")





HEY, DADDY, I'M A CANDYVORE!



Hi, I'm a stay-at-home dad. Now, before your eyes glaze over and you slowly back away, let me just tell you why I am one. Most boys don't spend their childhood dreaming of one day changing diapers, emptying dishwashers, washing pee-soaked bed sheets, kissing boo-boos, and learning to make chicken broccoli casserole. They want to be firemen, baseball stars, soldiers. As they get older, most men strive for career, status, and a lower golf handicap. Me, I had early dreams of a Hollywood career, collaborating with the likes of Spielberg, Lucas, and Coppola. Later, after grad school, there were visions of corporate ladders and hostile takeovers. But once my first child was born, everything changed, and my focus was placed squarely on the infant in my arms. Soon, my wife and I realized that one of us had to be home with him permanently. By financial default (my wife made more money than me), I was the lucky winner.

At first I had no idea how to be a father. Not having one around as a kid, I had no male role models to look to other than the ones I'd seen on TV. So I thought, "What would Charles Ingalls do? Or John Walton? Mike Brady? How about Darren Stevens?!" Actually, I discovered a really good role model on TV in Fred Rogers. I listen to him most carefully still. He's not just talking to pre-schoolers when he smiles into the camera and doles out sage advice... He's talking to us grown-ups too when he says things like "You don't have to look like everybody else to be acceptable and to feel acceptable." I learn a little wisdom from The Neighborhood most every single day. Plus, it's fun to see how graham crackers and crayons are made.

So I found myself in this new role, and it didn't take long to discover that it's one of the most difficult, exhausting, emotionallydraining jobs in the world. It's also the most rewarding. I get paid with hugs, smiles, and the occasional funny quote from my kids, like when my son learned that some animals are herbivores and some are carnivores, so he figured, "Hey, Daddy, I'm a Candyvore!" I can't think of anything else I'd rather be doing than to be my kids' dad. It's how I introduce myself to people when they ask what I do for a living. And it sure feels good to say that. I must be pretty good at my job, since just the other day my son said "When I grow up I want to be a daddy too!"

Taking on the role of Daddy meant giving up a few other things that once defined me, including a few friends who didn't understand why I was no longer sitting at a desk and earning an income. But I don't really miss the old life. This new one brings new adventures and challenges every single day. And I go out and solve the problems and figure out the challenges, every now and then seeking advice from the memory of some old TV



show, like *Little House on the Prairie* when my daughter tells a fib, or *The Brady Bunch* when my son teases his sister.

I've long given up attempting to explain to people I meet what I do and why I do it. Most folks just don't understand. They're either confused, condescending, or highly critical. Surprisingly, stay-at-home moms are the worst, almost like I'm attempting to gain membership into their exclusive club. The moms don't accept me, the dads don't understand me. Luckily I meet enough welcoming parents, including other stay-at-home dads, who also realize that having

one parent at home with the kids is the best way to raise them. Daycares are fine for single moms and dads who have no other support, but when a child has two parents in their lives it should have at least one of them as the daily caregiver.

So, I'm a stay-athome dad. You don't have to be afraid. You

don't have to feel sorry. I love what I'm doing (except for folding laundry) and, more importantly, I love my kids. Doing right by them is just about the only thing that's really important to me. Why would I want to do anything else?



Jeff's All-Purpose Hybrid

Jeff Yates tells me, "We were looking at the different hybrids, at the Toyota Prius and the Hondas. Honda has an Accord now with the six cylinders and the electric motor. It gets more power and keeps the same fuel economy. But the power wasn't our biggest issue. We've got a nine-year-old and a sixyear-old, and we carry around their baseball equipment, their backpacks for school, the whole works. The Civic was too small and so was the Prius, but we still wanted something that got good gas mileage, so we looked at the Ford Escape.

"It's roomy. I'm six feet tall, and I can sit in the back and feel comfortable behind the driver's seat with it adjusted as if I were driving. And they claim that it will get 36 mpg in town and 30

on the freeway. But I drive on the free-

way to and from work, and I'm averaging about 27 mpg. I work down on Otay Mesa and we live in Allied Gardens, so that's a pretty good commute. The Escape has a meter on the dash that tells you what gas mileage you're getting. Going to work is mostly uphill so I get about 27, but coming

"When you first drive a hybrid, if you pull up to a stoplight and the engine shuts off, you think, what happened, did it die on me? But you get over that. And the Escape is a comfortable ride. It feels like you're driving an SUV, up high. But with the economy, it's the best of both worlds."

home I'll get 31 or 32.

Having heard of SUVs being inclined to roll over, I ask, "Does it ever feel tipsy?"

"Sometimes," Jeff admits. "When you make a sharp turn, you get the feeling it could roll over if you cut it too sharp at a high speed. But if you're an experienced driver you're not going

to jerk the wheel."

"Does it have as much power as vou'd like?"

"Uh-huh. The motor's an Atkinson four-cylinder. The way they advertise it, it will go longer between oil changes and wear much better. One of my concerns was, with the engine always starting and shutting off, that it would wear down fast. But the way the guy described it, that's what this motor is made for, taking all that abuse without wearing down.

"It's got what they call a continual variable transmission, so it doesn't shift, like into passing gear, which is kind of hard to get used to. When you jump on it, it doesn't feel like it's taking off. But it accelerates. It doesn't feel like a four-cylinder. It definitely gets out of the way when vou need it to."

I ask, "Does the hybrid cost more than the gas-only model?"

"The non-hybrid was at \$22,000 or

\$23,000. Mine was around \$31,000."

"Well," I say, "With gas approaching \$3 a gallon it might not take long to save the difference."

Later I calculated that an improvement of 10 miles per gallon would save about 17 gallons per 1000 miles; 17 gallons at \$3.00 each is \$51. So if gas averages \$3.00 per gallon and the car's lifetime is 150,000, then Jeff will break even. Meanwhile, he's spewing less crud into our world.


