Dirty money Following last week's guilty plea of Randy Cunningham, the tentacles of



"Duke-Stir-gate" are spreading rapidly into local Republican money circles. Topping the list of reported coconspirators is **Brent R.** Wilkes, the Poway defense contractor and board member of the San Diego International Sports Council who made millions of dollars on government deals

pushed by Cunningham. He's widely said to be "Co-conspirator No. 1," described by prosecutors in last week's Cunningham plea agreement. Wilkes, who founded ADCS, a document-conversion outfit, has long been a dependable mother lode for GOP campaigns here, including those of county supervisor Ron Roberts and former congressmen Ron Packard and Brian Bilbray, who is now running for the seat Cunningham is vacating. Wilkes also gave to Democrats, including Senators Daniel K. Inouye of Hawaii and Charles Robb of Virginia. The money for Roberts came in his 2000 race against Dick Murphy, when Wilkes and his employees, vendors, and relatives teamed up to pump at least \$9750 into the Roberts cause. "I provided money to the campaign because I like Roberts's policies. I like his honesty," said Mark Adams, a Wilkes employee residing in Alexandria, Virginia.

Other ADCS workers hung up the phone when asked about their donations to Roberts, who has a history of receiving illegally reimbursed campaign contributions. (He's repeatedly denied knowing that the funds were laundered.) Contributors willing to speak also denied any wrongdoing. Richard Creighton, a Costa Mesa resident, explained his connection to ADCS and his campaign gift to Roberts: "I got something in the mail to come to a fund-raiser. I'm not really that politically savvy. I know nothing about San Diego politics. All I know is, ADCS is a customer of ours. They sell computer products to the government. Our company makes computer products. They use our products to satisfy their bid."

A year later, Wilkes and friends gave \$2500 to the failed city council effort of Roberts aide Steve Danon, who was running against Donna Frye. Another example of largess came in June 2003, when now-indicted House Majority Leader Tom DeLay got \$15,000 from PerfectWave Technologies, another Wilkes venture. DeLay used the money to help bankroll Congressional redistricting in Texas. Even as late as the first half of this year, the ADCS political action committee was anteing up big-time, giving a total of \$21,000, including \$5000 to Americans for a Republican Maiority Political Action Committee, \$5000 to Future Leaders PAC, \$5000 to Superior California Federal Leadership Fund, \$3000 to the American Dream PAC, and \$2000 to Milead Fund. Contributions to the ADCS committee came via employee "payroll withholding," according to the filing.


Ironically, Wilkes, whose house was searched by the FBI last summer, received one of 11 "Monty" awards handed out earlier this year by San Diego State University, from which he graduated with a business degree in 1977. "The Monty award is a symbol of achievement and success presented to distinguished alumni," said an SDSU news release. "Wilkes is a board member of numerous community and philanthropic groups, including The Campanile Foundation at SDSU." Campanile, presided over by SDSU president

Stephen Weber, was set up by him in 1999 to collect and manage large cash and real estate gifts for university use. The Al-

varado Estates Alvarado Estates mansion mansion where

Weber lives was purchased by Campanile board member Malin Burnham and donated to the state in September 2000.

Criminal education As the Duke Cunningham saga continued to unfold last week, one usually outspoken media voice remained uncharacteristically silent. Union-Tribune editorialist Bob Kittle, a regular participant on the KPBS Editors Roundtable, was nowhere to be seen. Maybe it had something to do with the fact that before the scandal broke, Cunningham's wife Nancy, a former teacher in the Encinitas Union School District and a former assistant secretary for management and chief information officer at the U.S. De-



been in line to become the director of the Rhoades School, owned by Kittle and his wife Luanne. The tony private school has 300 students in kindergarten through eighth grade, many from wealthy Rancho Santa Fe, where Cunningham pur-

chased a \$2.5 million dream house. The Kittles announced in April that Cun-

ningham would take over the school September 1, but she pulled out in June after it became known that a federal grand jury was looking into her husband's dealings. Instead, she remained as "administrator of support services" for the Encinitas Union School District, where she has worked for 30 years. ... Before ex-San Diego city councilman Ralph Inzunza was sentenced to 21 months in prison for his role in the strip-club influence-peddling scandal, friends wrote to the judge begging for leniency. Two of them were former members of the San Diego Unified school board, Ron Ottinger and Ed Lopez, key allies of then-superintendent Alan Bersin. In downplaying Inzunza's crimes, Ottinger took a shot at another local crook: "Former Port Commissioner David Malcolm was sentenced to only 120 days at a work furlough program for bilking taxpayers of millions of dollars in the Duke Energy scandal, which caused harm to every Californian."

San Diego's Ties To Treasure Islands

an Diego wheeler-dealers dumping Their stocks just can't get away whether to the Turks and Caicos Islands,


a Caribbean tax haven, or to Wilmington, Delaware, a corporate "lax" haven. Padres majority owner John

Moores, who sold \$487 million worth of Peregrine Systems stock during a three-year period in which the books were cooked, wanted to have civil suits against him and fellow former directors tried in Wilmington, Delaware, where the company was incorporated, rather than in California. Hordes of companies incorporate in Delaware because it is fraud-friendly: in an insidertrading case, investors have to prove that officers and directors had an intent to deceive. Under California law, defrauded investors have to prove only that insiders had negative material information that the public didn't have. Peregrine directors, including Moores, were told of accounting irregularities yet continued to dump stock, according to civil suits.

In March of this year, Superior Court Judge Joan M. Lewis ruled that a suit filed by the bankruptcy court-appointed trustee should be tried in Delaware. The decision would

attorney general's office wrote the court, siding with the trustee. Lewis's decision ran counter to "California's legitimate and compelling interest in preserving a business

climate free of fraud and deceptive practices," said the attorney general.

Last Friday, the appellate court agreed emphatically. The case will be heard under California law, which comes down hard on perceived "immoral conduct" that is "destructive to the public interest," said the court. The appeals court appears to be applying the state's tough standards to behavior beyond insider trading, says Robert Friese, the trustee. Moores and his fellow defendants will no doubt appeal to the supreme court. For now, though, Wilmington is out of the picture.

On November 10, a federal jury in San Diego ruled that James E. Franklin raked in profits from a "pump and dump" stock scam funneled through an account at a Turks and Caicos financial corporation. After a three-week trial and a week of deliberations, a jury found Franklin and an associate, Samuel Wolanyk, liable for securities fraud.

The Securities and Exchange Commission said the pair, along with related institutions and individuals, took in more than \$4 million from the Internet stock-touting scheme. The commission recommended that Franklin and Wolanyk cough up a total of \$11 million for their transgressions. continued on page 8

To Condemn A Cash Cow

ast summer's trial of San Diego councilmen Michael Zucchet and Ralph Inzunza produced an unexpected candor from the city's

Redevelopment Agency. On June 24, Zucchet's attorney Raymond (Jerry) Coughlan called agency employee Alex Greenwood to the witness stand. The move seemed intended to hammer home a point: that since the beginning of his only city council term, Zucchet's "first, second, and third priorities" had been to get rid of the Body Shop and Les Girls strip clubs in Loma Portal. Coughlan had said earlier in the trial, according to Kelly Thornton's May 11 story in the Union-Tribune, that Zucchet was willing to listen to Galardi's representatives about no-touch at Galardi's club, Cheetahs in Kearny Mesa, "if they talk about Mr. Galardi buying [Les Girls and the Body Shop] and turning them into Krispy Kreme (doughnut shop) or a sports bar."

In the June 24 court transcripts, attorney Coughlan began by asking Greenwood to describe the Redevelopment Agency. "We look at blighted areas of the city," said Greenwood, "and [put] together real estate deals to bring in new businesses, new housing, new office and other uses to create new jobs and revitalize the area." Greenwood went on to include as part of the agency's work planning and providing public infrastructure for the blighted areas.

Coughlan asked the witness about the concept "blighted area." "I take it," said the attorney, "that that's a term of art within redevelopment jargon. Is that correct?"

"Yes," Greenwood answered. "Under the California Health and Safety Code, there's a specific definition of what a blighted area is. An example...would be an area that suffers from dilapidated buildings, parcels that are so small and irregular that they cannot accommodate modern development, lack of public amenities or infrastructure, broken sidewalks, for example, [or] crime."

The most recent assign-

the Redevelopment Agency was to oversee the North Bay Redevelopment Project Area, 1360 acres along Interstate 5 and Pacific Highway and in the Midway area. Greenwood told the court that "one of the main, prominent gateways into that area is off of the freeways on Camino del Rio [West] and Rosecrans [Boulevard], and there is about a 5-acre area there that we zeroed in on. Because of its prominent location, we thought it was a potentially good site for some sort of real estate project." Greenwood labeled the area blighted. The five-acre site described

ment Greenwood had with

(and most of the North Bay Redevelopment Project Area) lies within Zucchet's former council District 2 and contains the Body Shop and Les Girls strip clubs. Greenwood described for the court how, beginning on March 24, 2003, shortly after Zucchet came into office, he met with the councilman every couple of months, and with the councilman's staff almost weekly, to figure out ways to move the strip clubs and an adult bookstore out of the area. Also in attendance at the first meeting with Zucchet was Greenwood's boss, Hank Cunningham, the city's director of the Community and Economic Development Department and assistant executive director of the Redevel-



opment Agency.

Greenwood said he pointed out to Zucchet that the adultentertainment businesses were likely"cash cows" that the city could not afford to buy out by itself. He also told Zucchet that rezoning the area to try to force them out would not work, since they were "grandfathered in." Eventually, Greenwood testified, he convinced Zucchet that the redevelopment plan for the area around the strip clubs would be sufficient to do the trick.

Greenwood then told the court, "We developed a list of opportunity sites. We analyzed the parcels, looking at such things as property tax data, zoning, and sales tax data.... We looked specifically at the area inclusive of and surrounding the Body Shop and Les Girls sites." Greenwood continued moments later in the same vein: "We tried to get a good idea of...the underground soil conditions, the appraised value of the land, all the information that a devel-



oper might want to know before they started thinking seriously about it. We contacted several developers to see if there was any interest in pursuing it; some people seemed interested, some people didn't. We really tried general marketing to try and develop interest in that site, and nothing worked at first for several months.... It was all me and one other person working on this. We worked very hard on it."

Since Les Girls and the Body Shop sit on small parcels of 5000 to 10,000 square feet apiece but bring in large amounts of revenue, Greenwood said he figured he needed additional parcels to go along with them. "Buying other pieces of land at a cheaper price because they don't have such income-producing uses on them would allow you to get enough land to do a modern development, and it would also lower your average cost of acquiring the land."

"Is this a project," asked Coughlan, "that the developer and your agency...would work on together?"

"Yes, through a development agreement," answered greenwood. "The classic agreement would be the developer...would take the lead on this. They would take the lead on buying all the land, and we would help support them either financially or using our *continued on page 8*

But U.S. District Judge Dana M. Sabraw, declaring that this sum was too high, would assess Wolanyk only \$50,000 and Franklin \$770,000.

In asking for a larger judgment, the federal securities commission said that Franklin and Wolanyk used various subterranean means to hide their "ill-gotten gains," including "foreign bank and brokerage accounts, particularly in jurisdictions notorious for their secrecy laws." The pair "refused to provide documents from foreign brokerage and bank accounts, and have destroyed such documents," charged the agency.

Their lawyers deny the commission's charges and claim it overstepped its mandate. Both say the offshore involvement prejudiced the jury. "It definitely colored the case. The jury used that offshore connection" in finding the two liable, says Darren J. Quinn, Franklin's attorney.

"I was disappointed in the jury," says Gregory M. Garri-

son, Wolanyk's attorney. "They said, 'These guys have offshore bank accounts; they must be doing something.' "

This case should be a lesson for San Diegans. If some lawyer or accountant is trying to talk you into stashing money offshore to hide it from the Internal Revenue Service or an ex-spouse, think more than twice: that black hole you believe you are creating may prove to be your personal abyss. Jurors will look askance at a defendant with money stashed in a secret account offshore. How do they know there isn't more stashed somewhere? Those jurors' suspicions are likely to be right on target.

For more than a decade in San Diego, Franklin has been immersed in dicey penny stocks. His company, Initial Public Offering Consultants, one of the defendants in the government's suit, has helped emerging companies tap the public market, often by merging into an empty-shell company rather than selling shares directly to the public.

Franklin has proved to be nimble in the rough-and-tumble penny-stock arena. Eleven

years ago, he got into a dustup with a lawyer who represented speculators tied to the raucous Vancouver Stock Exchange. The lawyer had been disciplined by two British Columbia government agencies, but Franklin didn't know that. Among many things, Franklin called the lawyer a forger, thief, and computer saboteur, and the lawyer called Franklin a blackmailer and thief, according to lawsuits in the case. The lawyer claimed that Franklin physically threatened him — a charge Franklin denied.

According to the Securities and Exchange Commission, Franklin hooked up with the Turks and Caicos corporation through Union Securities, a brokerage house in Vancouver. Franklin was assistant managing director of the offshore operation Vector Keel Ltd. and through it acquired and sold shares that were touted in the pump-and-dump scam, says the commission.

Quinn's response in court: the securities agency has no jurisdiction over transactions conducted outside the United States.

Wolanyk had formerly

worked for Franklin at Initial Public Offering Consultants. In January of 1997, Wolanyk established Red Hot Stocks, which began touting stocks over the Internet. "Franklin orchestrated the fraudulent scheme to tout companies on the Red Hot website and then sell the stocks of the companies profiled," charges the commission's complaint. Franklin set up a company called Net Income to operate Red Hot and attempted to conceal his involvement, says the government.

During the bubble years of 1997 and 1998, Red Hot touted low-priced stocks of many companies that were also clients of Franklin's consulting firm, says the commission.

Investors got misleading information from Red Hot, says the agency. There were unreasonable price projections—up, up, up in a hurry. Franklin and his confreres failed to disclose that they owned stock in the issues that got rave reviews and in some cases would be paid for hyping a stock. They bought stocks that were later touted on Red Hot "with the intent to sell the stock in coordination with the tout," says the agency. In short, the strategy was to buy the stock, pump it, and dump it, says the commission.

Garrison claims that in most instances, Wolanyk did not sell stock after he touted it. In the cases in which he did, the company whose stock was pumped had put a paid advertisement in Red Hot. But the jury said he committed fraud in 13 stocks.

Quinn asserts that Franklin sold only one stock after it was touted in Red Hot, although the jury said he was involved in seven pump-and-dump capers. Franklin really was not an officer of Vector Keel, despite what the securities agency avers, says Quinn. The individual who headed Vector Keel wrote an account statement stating "that Jim Franklin has authority to trade [through the offshore institution]. But did he get Franklin's consent? No," claims Quinn.

The jury believed the government and not the defendants. If I had been sitting on that jury, I suspect I would have voted the same way. A lawyer can say that "there is no proof" that his client traded through a secrecy-shrouded offshore institution, but *of course* there is no proof. That's what offshore secrecy is all about: covering up a paper trail.

negotiating powers to try and purchase the land."

Coughlan then inquired about the condemnation tool. "Under redevelopment

law," Greenwood replied, "if we're in a redevelopment agreement with a developer and they use their best-faith efforts to acquire land just through the private market but fail, if there are one or two people that will not sell their land at a fair market value, we can then come in and negotiate with them.... And if that fails, then we have the legal ability to condemn the property and take ownership of it. We pay the property owner fair market value and any other costs associated with that, but we take possession of the land by force."

"Did somebody step forward and make a proposal to *continued on page 12*



develop this piece of property [at and around Les Girls and the Body Shop]?"

"Yes. All through 2003 we were doing marketing efforts to different developers and other stakeholders. In late [2003] I was approached by a community leader who said, 'Be prepared, you're going to get a proposal from a local property owner. He owns land immediately behind Les Girls and the Body Shop, and he wants to do some sort of project there.' And sure enough, in February [2004], we got a written proposal from a local property owner saying he wanted the agency's assistance in acquiring a large amount of land."

"Is this what's known as an owner-participation effort or offer?" "Yes."

During cross-examination, assistant U.S. attorney Paul Cook asked Greenwood whether Councilwoman Donna Frye had shown an eagerness similar to Zucchet's to get rid of Les Girls and the Body Shop. A small part of the North Bay Redevelopment Project Area lies in Frye's District 6.

"No, her focus was very different," Greenwood replied. "Her agenda for District 6 and the North Bay redevelopment was more concerned for helping small businesses. She was very suspicious... about any heavy-handed use of redevelopment."

"By 'heavy-handed,' " inquired Cook, "you mean she had some concerns, perhaps, about this condemnation procedure that Mr. Coughlan asked you about, where the city goes in and condemns property and then buys out someone whether



tion, I think she is reluctant to support any large redevelopment real estate project," said Greenwood. "She just has a distrust of developers, if I may say."

Cook then asked whether Zucchet shared "those same views. [Did he] have a distrust of the heavy-handed use of condemnation procedures?"

"I didn't really get that sense from him. He seemed to want aggressive and forthright actions from the Redevelopment Agency," said Greenwood.

To better appreciate Greenwood's candor while under oath, we jump to late December 2004. That's when Greenwood wrote to the owners of the "opportunity sites"-ten parcels between Kurtz and Hancock Streets behind Les Girls and the Body Shop. In the letter, Greenwood told the owners that he had received on December 14 an official, "unsolicited" written proposal to build condominiums on their properties from business neighbor Bill Kenton, owner of 40 percent of the land in question. Although none of the owners except Kenton had ever heard of the city's designs on their area, Greenwood gave them 30 days to sign on to the new proposal, agreeing to sell to Kenton, or to draw up and present their own owner-participation offer. In other words, the majority of the owners were to receive a month to develop an ownerparticipation offer like the one that Kenton had been collaborating on with the city since the previous February. In response to the letter,

Joe Fritzenkotter, owner of Vanard Lithographics, one of



the targeted businesses and employer of 100 skilled workers, told me he invited Greenwood to tour his facilities in January 2005. He mentioned to Greenwood that once, during the previous year, Bill Kenton had made an offer to buy his property but without suggesting the deal was part of city redevelopment plans. It therefore took Fritzenkotter aback several months later, he says he told Greenwood, when Kenton "hinted" that the city might take his property in an eminent domain action if he continued refusing to sell. "Greenwood said that I must have misunderstood," said Fritzenkotter, "that eminent domain was not being considered."

Greenwood's letter to the business owners eventually provoked a storm of protest among all of them except Kenton. On March 21, 2005, a subcommittee of the North Bay Redevelopment Project Area Committee met to hear their complaints and make a recommendation. During the meeting, Chris Clifford, who owns a small share in one affected business, accused Greenwood and Kenton of working behind the backs of the other owners. Greenwood denied it. But the subcommittee recommended that the Kenton proposal be rejected.

On March 29, Greenwood appeared with Kenton and Vanard Lithographics representative Rene Coons on the KPBS program *Full Focus*. The show's host, Gloria Penner, asked how well the redevelopment plan for the Body Shop and Les Girls area was being received. Greenwood suggested that people in the area were excited about change.

Almost three months later, Greenwood was testifying under oath in the councilmen's trial. In between, court records show, the FBI interviewed him concerning his conversations with Zucchet. Although both Greenwood and Cunningham resigned their positions over the spring and summer, proponents of the redevelopment plan are going ahead with what they now call "the Gateway Project." On December 15, the North Bay Redevelopment Project Area Committee will elect nine new members; the committee will then have to address "Gateway" again. ■





"[When I'm taking the Eucharist], I'm consuming Jesus' body, if you view it with eyes of faith," said Eileen Carton, a volunteer at Holy Spirit Catholic Church. "How else can you get that close to God? When I take Eucharist, if I lack faith, I am given faith. If I am burdened, Jesus takes my burden" Carton said

she's been enamored with communion since she was seven years old. "As a Japanese-American, I was raised Buddhist, but when a friend took me to Mass with her family, I saw the holiness and beauty of the Mass. I was taken aback by seeing Jesus at the consecration. When I saw this, Jesus spoke to my heart and told me I was home. I get so excited about this, I just thank the Lord."

"What really makes the Catholic Church different is that we take Jesus seriously when he gave us the Sacrament of Holy Orders. We take the wine and bread and believe they become the literal body and blood of Jesus," said Dennis Gorsich, a pastoral associate."We're actually at that Last Supper during the Eucharist. It's like being in a time warp. I often feel closer to God because I've taken the Eucharist. Jesus is clearing away the things that are not good in me.

'When I was 27, I had a born-again experience, as the Protestants call it. Now, I really enjoy sharing my faith and what being a Catholic is all about." Dennis Gorsich serves as an adult educator with the parish. Gorsich believes adult education is especially necessary because of the change in cultural opinions."The Catholic Church doesn't go along with every whim of popular culture." Gorsich cited the Church's controversial stances against birth control, abortion, and homosexuality. "I like that there are solid church teachings to grab on to. I am comforted by this stability. It is difficult to teach these things because people tend to want things their own way. This is the basic sin of man, selfishness. Even if it comes to their faith, they pick and choose what they agree with the Catholic Church on. This is the same plurality you see in Protestant churches. This is why it is so important to have adult education because the Catholic faith is not a cafeteria plan.'

At Holy Spirit Catholic Church, Mass is conducted in three languages: English, Vietnamese, and Spanish. The inner sanctuary walls are covered with dark wood paneling. Stainedglass windows that depict the sacraments and gifts of the Holy Spirit are interspersed with the Stations of the Cross. The tabernacle of the Blessed Sacrament, designed to resemble the Ark of the Covenant, sits on a stone pillar in the front of the sanctuary. Above it hangs a large wooden crucifix. Several statues of Vietnamese martyrs reflect the Vietnamese presence at the church.

Last Sunday, associate pastor Father Doan Van Lai celebrated the 7:30 a.m. service. Deacon Marvin Threatt, an African-American, bellowed with a deep voice, "The Lord is coming, get ready for a blessing!" On this second Sunday of Advent, Threatt preached a message on repentance. "We must change our lives and turn away from our sin. We cannot just change our actions; we must change our hearts. And when we are changed, we will live in harmony, peace, and righteousness." Threatt paced the front of the Sanctuary as he preached. Deacon Threatt's lively message included hand gestures, stories, and interaction with the congregation. After the Mass, I asked Deacon

Threatt about his sermon delivery. "I use an Afro-centric style of preaching. It's alive. Nobody is going to sleep when I preach," said Threatt. Several nearby congregants agreed. "I love his style, it's refreshing," said one Hispanic man. "I always walk

panic man. "I always walk away with life application," added a young lady. Threatt said he believes the acceptance and involvement of many cultures is what makes the Holy Spirit so unique. "We are one of the few places were multiculturalism works. That is because our multiculturalism is a true reflection of the neighborhood surrounding this church."

Robert Griffith heads the Catholic Charismatic Center at Holy Spirit Catholic Church. The Charismatic Center promotes and educates on the charismatic gifts for all San Diego Catholic Churches. "I pray in tongues," said Griffith of his charismatic activity." It's a way

of letting God take charge of my prayers. When we pray, it's all us, but this way, God prays for what we really need. It's hard to explain the sensation when this is happening. Some people feel warmth from the Holy Spirit, others have a rush of joy or sadness, depending on what God is doing at the time." Griffith said people can attend a Live in the Spirit seminar hosted at different parishes to learn how to use spiritual gifts.

I asked Dennis Gorsich what happens to a person after he dies. "A person will face a personal judgment by Jesus Christ who determines if he spends eternity with God or without God," replied Gorsich. "Jesus looks at your life and what you've done. We need to try to be holy and obey His commands. The Catholic Church believes all people can be saved. God's mercy reaches out to people who don't believe in Jesus Christ if they are trying to choose to do what is right or are sorry for the wrong they have done. The more you know, ultimately the more responsible you are." — Drew E. Goodmanson

The game is afoot. Every year, my husband Patrick and I try to outdo one another's Christmas gifts. Not for their perfection or beauty, but for their goofy fittingness. Last year, he won, giving me the sparkling ruby slippers I'd always wanted as a child, when watching *The Wizard of Oz* on TV was an annual celebration for me. He still won't tell me

where he found them. This year, I'm thinking of getting him a real sword — if I loved *The Wizard* of Oz, he worshipped the swashbuckling in Zorro and *The Adventures* of *Robin Hood*. Something he could use to fend off the evil Guy of Gisbourne, should he ever attack La Mesa.

I checked in with Jim Ferguson, owner of Twisted Nickel in Temecula (951-719-1552; www.twistednickel.com). Ferguson makes highend handmade swords for collectors, and he was willing to give me a rundown on his handiwork. "A sword is made up of a blade, then a ricasso, which is the area that attaches to the guard. The guard keeps your hand from sliding forward, and keeps your opponent's blade from hitting your knuckles. Scottish swords have a basket handle that covers the knuckles completely. There are also guards known as bladebreakers; if you could catch your opponent's blade in it and make a quick return, it might break the blade. Behind the guard is a spacer, to adapt the guard to the handle. The butt end of the handle is called the pommel."

Ferguson makes "a more traditional Celtic-Scots style of sword. Slimmer swords like this are made more for penetrating the body, as opposed to the broadswords, which are sharpened heavily. Broadswords are more cutting, chopping swords; they're used when there's a lot of armor involved."

The sword starts with the steel. "What makes one sword better than another is the hardness of the steel. Your car fender is made out of 1018 steel; it would be too soft to make a good blade. I use 1095 steel — steel is an alloy of carbon and iron, and 1095 is nearly one percent carbon. Carbon is what allows you to harden the blade. Once you hit one to one and a half percent, the steel won't take

any more carbon." To harden his blade, Ferguson heats the steel to 1500 degrees "with molden salt. I have a special furnace with a tube down the center. In the tube are rock salt, potassium, and carbonate; at 1500 degrees, the salt is liquid and glowing. I use liquid salt because it transfers heat better than air, and because it eliminates oxygen, which causes scaling. I dip the sword into the salt until it gets up to temperature, about two minutes. Then I pull it out and dip it into cold brine — salt water. It's a very violent reaction when I quench the blade, because it's red-hot. The quenching lines up all the molecules in the steel, and makes them very hard - at times, too hard."

By this point, the blade is often at something like 60 Rockwell — a scale that measures hardness. "When it's that hard, it's brittle. If you hit something, the blade will snap. I'll wait about 20 minutes for martensite to form — the steel will get a mottled look to it. Then I'll heat the blade to 475 degrees in an oven, and that will draw some of the hardness out, tempering it and giving it some spring. I draw my swords back to 58 Rockwell. At 56, it'll take an edge, but it won't hold it very long. That's too soft."

Once the steel is tempered, Ferguson polishes it. "You can do it with emery paper, but I use a belt grinder, and then I buff it. And since I use Damascus steel and I want the pattern to show, I etch the blade with an acid. That brings out the differential between the nickel and the steel. See, regular steel is one solid block of metal; Damascus steel is a laminate. I start out with 400 pieces — alternating layers of highcarbon steel and nickel. All 400 layers make a piece only two and a quarter inches thick. The pieces are wire-tied and soaked in a liquid flux. I put it in the furnace, and when it comes out, I squish it down with a 75-ton hydraulic press. That makes it into

one solid block; it's called pattern welding. Each piece of metal keeps its identity — you can see each layer separate from the others but they're all together in one block. The acid darkens the steel, but it doesn't attack the nickel."

his to that craftsmanship doesn't come cheap his swords may cost between \$2400 and \$2600. I told him that was out of my ballpark, and he gave me advice for my continuing hunt. "For an average, decent sword, you have to spend \$150 and up. Look for the country of origin. Japanese, German, Spanish, and American swords are pretty good, and made to be functional. Some of the wall-hangers are not functional. If it looks good and you like it, fine, but if you want to join a re-enactment group, you may want something better."

Dan Tresko of Dante's Knife Works in Escondido (760-741-3731; *www.dantesknifeworks.com*) offers more than 40 swords on his website. Most are functional — that is, ready for actual swordplay. Prices range from **\$112.50** to **\$599**, depending on style and maker. "Most of my swords are bought by collectors and re-enactors," said Tresko.

"What sells depends on what movies are playing. When *The Last Samurai* was out, the Japanese swords were very popular. When *Braveheart* was playing, it was the two-hand longsword that sold."

The Edge in Horton Plaza (619-233-7030) has 20 swords in-store to choose from, and over 45 more in its catalogs. Prices range from **\$69** to **\$200** for nonfunctional swords and from **\$250** to **\$1800** for functional swords.

woke up to the sound of rain drumming on the cedar shingles and inhaled deeply. My delighted exhalation alerted David to my conscious state.

"Hey," he whispered. I slowly opened my eyes to meet his, noting from the crispness of his clear blue orbs that he'd been awake for a while. "It snowed last night."

"Really?" "It's not much, but that's the first snow of the season," David said, directing my gaze to the small window across the room. I grabbed my glasses from the nightstand and looked out the window: through undulating streams of water I could see the roof, dusted with a lacy layer of what looked like powdered sugar. I marveled that the rain hadn't washed it away before I had a chance to see this sprinkled white proof of how cold the night had been.

I glanced at the red numerals on the digital clock behind David's head - was it already 9:30? The gray sky had tricked us into sleeping later than usual, and my instinct was to panic. One by one, I shushed my worries by reminding myself that we were not at home. I should check my phone, the panicked me thought. Your phone *doesn't work here*, the calm me answered. Nothing was on the agenda; I hadn't looked at my calendar in over three days. We had no one to see and nowhere to be. But what calmed me most of all was the vision through the window ----the weather outside was "frightful," which, to me, was delightful.

It was over 70 degrees the day we left San Diego for Boston, where we would spend time with friends before taking a bus and then a ferry to Martha's Vineyard, where we would once again join David's parents in celebration of Thanksgiving. I was aware of how much I would miss the turkey rituals of home, but at the same time, I looked forward to getting out of town for some longoverdue rest. Holing away on an island in late autumn has a magical way of stopping the clock.

In silent acknowledgement of my position as more than her son's "friend," Ency had prepared our room by pushing together its two twin beds. Reaching over the small gap between these beds now to rub my arm, David asked, "What do you want to do today?"

"Play Scrabble. Read. Drink hot cocoa. You know, a whole lot of 'nothing productive," I answered. I waited for it, I expected it, but the guilt did not come. While the trees outside bent to the howling wind and rain, doing "nothing productive" inside as a houseguest was not only acceptable, it was mandatory.

I love stormy weather — thunderstorms, snowstorms, rainstorms, you name it. Bad weather simultaneously fills me with nostalgia, excitement, and relaxation. When I was six years old and living in Alaska, snow days were as frequent and welcome as Saturday morning cartoons. For those of you who have never ventured farther north than Los Angeles, a "snow day" is when the weather is so bad that school is cancelled and most adults are not expected to show up for work. A snow day is a gift — you are given a day to do whatever you would do if there was nothing you *had* to do. In Rhode Island, storms were not as common, which only served to make them even more special. It was in Rhode Island that I conditioned myself to associate the sound of rain with the taste of tea and bread, but not just any kind of bread — sliced white bread, toasted until it is brown and crispy on the outside and then covered with butter, granulated sugar, and generous shakes of cinnamon. The tea was always Lipton's black, Dad's favorite, with at least two teaspoonfuls of sugar to make it palatable enough for an eight-year-old.

A power outage was a spooky yet rewarding phenomenon during which we would huddle together in the flickering light only candles can create and marvel at the silence of a disabled television. If the thunder was particularly loud, Penny, the canine member of our family, was allowed inside to shiver and moan her concern while my sisters and I charted the distance of the approaching storm by counting the seconds between the bright streaks in the sky and the claps of sound that followed.

If there was a slight nip in the air, we could assume there would be packets of Swiss Miss cocoa with marshmallows to warm us. The aroma of cinnamon sticks boiling in apple cider — a rare treat Mom saved for the coldest of days. This tang wafted from the kitchen at the first sign of snow, filling the house with the smell of comfort. When the weather was bad, the family gathered in one room; the fire was lit, the board games came out, and the world seemed to stop turning as a personal favor from



Mother Nature to my family alone.

David and I dressed he in a fuzzy fleece and me in a cozy, orange sweater — and made our way downstairs.

"It's funny, you know," I said, preparing a paste from the Droste cocoa powder I found in Ency's kitchen cupboard. After I had added hot water to my creation of chocolatey goodness, I continued my line of thought for David, who was laying the Scrabble board on the table beneath a ceiling that was half-filled with skylights. As I spoke, I gazed in wonder at the rivulets of water running down the inclined windows. "We never do this at home, and I think it's because the weather is always so nice. People aren't out and about they're not running errands and attending events, they're doing this."

"What's 'this'?" asked David.

"This is weather-forced relaxation," I said. *"Something that doesn't happen in San Diego. This is a good book, good company, warm drinks, the smell of wood smoke, the relief of having nowhere to be and nothing to do but sit here, play this game with you, and drink this cup of steaming cocoa in my hand."*

"San Diego doesn't *have* weather," David said, not for the first time.

"I know, but wouldn't it be nice...I mean, why should we wait to relax until we have no other options? When we return home, after we catch up of course, I want to do *this.*"

"It won't happen," sighed David. "There's always work to be done, you always manage to pack the calendar tight."

John Lennon 1940 – 1980

Along with many vidiots my age, television was the teat that nurtured us all, and I was less weaned than most. I recall "discovering" the Beatles on a Smothers Brothers show from October 1968 (which I recently re-watched, spotting a then-unknown Steve Martin). I immediately bought any and every magazine that featured their likenesses — no small stack of reading material — and immersed myself for the first time in abject fandom (well, aside from my short-lived obsession with the Banana Splits).

At first, I was a Ringo fan — I think I related to the fact that he'd been small and sickly as a child — and for Christmas 1970 my folks got me a drum kit. Just a little three-piece with a saucer-sized cymbal, a foot-shaped drum pedal, and a photo of three very Brady kids fronting the bass drum. (Temporary madness on my parents' part.) There are photos of me "playing" these '70s skins that day, as well as pics of me dressed in an army suit with a net-covered combat helmet, destined to wind up on *A Current Affair* or *Court TV* after I become famous or notorious for Lord knows what.

By Christmas '71, I was into rock, and I was into the counterculture. I may not have actually smoked pot or had sex or flipped off a pig yet, but I'd been reading about all that stuff in subversive magazines like *Mad*, *National Lampoon, Playboy*, among others that probably shouldn't have been so easy for me to get my 11-year-old hands on. The Beatles provided the sound track to that Christmas, with my gifts comprising a collection of Fab Four albums and 45s I didn't already own. The band had split up, and that was all we talked about among my many Beatleholic friends (this was the first time my family had lived in one place long enough for me to accumulate something as exotic as friends!).

I remember tears in my eyes listening to "The End" on *Abbey Road*, knowing it was probably the last new Beatles song I'd ever hear. I felt swept up in emotions when I first heard John and Yoko sing "Merry Xmas, War Is Over (If You Want It)." The next holiday, when I received Lennon-style eyeglasses under the tree, I wore

them with the faux army gear (snug, but still a fit), so I'd look just like John's character in *How I Won the War* (which I knew of but didn't see until the early-'80s advent of home video).


At 20, I was off on my own, 3000 miles away in San Diego, when the holidays rolled around. In early December 1980, I went to a showing of Fantasia, which I (an aspiring animator) had never seen. Sitting there in the big old Cinerama widescreen in Mission Valley, I was awed by the incredible achievement of the animators and blown away by the symphonic sound. It was as if I was seeing magic unfold right before my eyes, a handmade creation birthed in the minds of the artists, musicians, and magicians and brought directly to life through the animators' fingers and onto the movie screen. It almost seemed a Christmas miracle to my jaded sensibilities, to be so enthralled, to catch a passing wisp of magic. I wanted to go on holding it, if for just a short while. I sat through two showings.

After daylight broke over Bald Mountain, with my imagination still reeling and my mind fucked, I walked out of the theater, and the magic fell away.

Everyone in the parking lot had their radios turned up and were walking around as if dazed, talking and crying. The DJ was saying that John Lennon had been shot and killed. Nothing I found under the tree that Christmas could cheer me up.

Every year since, I dream of John Lennon on Christmas Eve. Sometimes we jam, once in a while he performs just for me or for a handful of people (a few times reunited with you know who). On occasion I interview him — Everything I Ever Wanted to Know About Lennon but He Was Too Dead to Ask — and once we hung out together at a Pink Floyd concert (John thought Dave Gilmour looked "like a fookin' well-fed wanker!").

No doubt, this Christmas Eve I'll dream about that most influential of dreamers again. Every time this happens, I find myself rediscovering the humani-

ty, insight, and morality/mortality that he represents to me. Part of the reason I sleep late on Christmas morning is that I'm reluctant to say goodbye to him; I don't WANT the dream to be over, and I'm desperate to keep my hands wrapped around that wisp of magic, for — just — a — few — moments — longer. — Jay Allen Sanford,

I remember my next-door neighbor Bernard crying one day. I kept asking him what was wrong, and he finally told me, through sobs, "Elvis died." His mom had a shrine to Elvis in her living room, and they took it hard.

When I was 11, John Lennon was shot. I thought of Bernard, whom I hadn't seen in years.

What I remember about that day is Howard Cosell, who at that time was just as famous in my eyes. I would hear people talk about the Beatles as "mop tops," but it was Cosell's toupee that my dad made fun of.

I remember Cosell, during that *Monday Night Football* game, saying something like, "This has just been handed to me..." You knew he wasn't going to tell you about the quarterback, it was his "this just in" newscaster voice.

My parents were shocked, and when you are a child, that is powerful. The next day at school, we were all talking about it on the playground. It was strange to discuss in class; the teacher didn't seem angry and wanted to talk about the shooting with us. I remember, in line at the cafeteria, the school bully came up to me and said, "Do you know what it will take to reunite the Beatles?" I shook my head and he said, "Three more bullets."

President Reagan was shot soon after. He lived, which made me question why that was news (a kid's logic is sometimes odd).

Five months after Lennon was shot, Pope John Paul II was shot in the arm and abdomen. I thought two things: when the newscaster said "Pope John Paul..." I thought it didn't sound complete without "George and Ringo" after it. I also wondered how often people got shot. My parents tried to calm me down, saying it didn't happen often. Then on October 6, my birthday in 1981, Anwar Sadat, the President of Egypt, was assassinated on live TV.

It wasn't until I was an adult that I realized how tragic Lennon's death was. The Beatles had become one of my favorite groups. I would read the lyrics and think about other musicians who died young. Usually it was from drug overdoses or a plane crash. They didn't get shot. And the ones who did, there were reasons behind it. Sam Cooke was in a hotel with a prostitute who tried to rip him off. Marvin Gaye was shot by his dad, angry about his son's drug addiction. And in the rap world, well, you get shot for wearing the wrong color or for being West Coast instead of East.

Lennon was shot by a guy who was insane. A guy who had him autograph a *Double Fantasy* album earlier that same day (it went on to sell for \$500,000, touted as "one of the last autographs Lennon signed"). A guy who tried to kill himself in Hawaii but was saved by a man who now wishes he hadn't.

A story I once read about the history of *Monday Night Football* said that John Lennon and Ronald Reagan were once visiting the booth at the same time. Cosell turned around to see the Gipper explaining the game to Lennon. To think they would both be shot within 90 days of each other. And that most of the United States heard the news about Lennon during the football game...

It wasn't until about five years ago that football stopped causing me sad memories. Now it's about my fantasy football team, the Chargers continuing to frustrate me, and my hatred of the Raiders.

However, football is relegated to Sunday and Monday. Not a day goes by that I don't listen to some Beatles tunes.

When the details started to become clear, I realized I was only a few blocks from the scene when it happened. The shooting occurred around 8 p.m. At that time I was on the West Side Highway, somewhere around 80th Street West. The Dakota

though I was really getting into all the punk rock and new wave bands of the day bands such as Dead Kennedys, X, Gang of Four, etc. — I had grown up listening to all the great rock bands and was still a big fan of the Beatles, Stones, Zeppelin, Bowie, etc.

I remember being at work on Monday; it was a busy time of year, and I was working late as we were trying to get everything shipped out for the holidays. I was listening to KGB, which at the time used to play a great variety of music, everything from the Ramones and Sex Pistols to Rolling Stones and Beatles. The DJ broke from the music and announced that John Lennon had been shot and killed. I turned the radio up to hear what he was saying. I was unable to finish my work that

night. I went and told the owners, a nice older couple from NYC, what had happened. One of them began to cry. We all sat there for a couple minutes, and then I said I had to go home.

— Tim Mays, longtime area concert promoter, owner of the Casbah The day John Lennon died, my 9-year-old son A.J. and I were in New York City. We were in town dealing with the never-ending litigation related to my late husband, Jim Croce. Jim had died in a plane crash in 1973, but the litigation

lived on. We had returned to our hotel after another long day of mean-spirited depositions. Our room overlooked Central Park, and A.J. was looking out the window when he noticed people acting strangely down below. From our window we could see

people crying and embracing, while others had dropped to their knees weeping.

We thought that the President had been shot, and immediately I thought of John Kennedy. We turned on the TV and learned the terrible news. Both A.I. and I were fans of the Beatles, and I was fortunate to have met John Lennon in Los Angeles in the late '70s. It seemed like such a personal loss, and I was flooded with the memories of when Jim had died. We spent a very sad night watching the news and thought about going over to the Dakota, but it all seemed too overwhelming. Every December, I am reminded of that sad night and how much the world needs John Lennon today. — Ingrid Croce,

The loss of Lennon was one that had me caught between two eras. I was in fourth grade when he was shot, attending an inner-city school. If we had been told that Marvin Gave had been shot (a news flash still a few years in the offing), I think we all would have been struck more dramatically. As it was, there was much more shrugging than wailing. At the same time, my parents were too old to have been Beatles fans, so I'm not sure the subject even came up at home. But one of my classmates was pretty worked up about it, and this got me interested.

I decided that it was some kind of doubledigit-aged rite of passage, to be a Beatles fan, so I began getting books and magazines on the Beatles...without actually

listening to any of the music. There were no Beatle records at my home, and while my uncle owned many, all *he* wanted to talk about was the Lovin' Spoonful. I knew snatches of songs, but that was it. Because I only had books and magazines to rely on, I ended up having less interest in the Beatles than in '60s marketing and media.

A year or so later (an eternity in kid-time), I ended up getting rewarded by my begrudging father with a copy of Rubber Soul, which interested me because of the cover. As much as I tried to like the Beatles, something about my genetic disposition made it a lost cause. My heart had been won by the Ink Spots; their records were in abundance in my mother's home. Luckily, she hung out with middle-aged lawyers, and while I continually found myself out of step on playgrounds and at

dances, I held court at piano bars from age 11 onward.

But Ringo? Now, as a huge fan of *Caveman*, *that* loss would have *shattered* me.

"The dope-smoking commie fag is dead" was the secondhand newscast that announced Lennon's death to me. The words came from my stepfather when I asked why people were crying on the news.

I was 13 years old and knew of Lennon mostly as the Beatle who wasn't in Wings.

My stepfather's description was a treasure map to some undiscovered cool, as cool was defined as anything he hated.

He had analyzed my idols as "fags" (Kiss and Queen, one out of eight members), "Commies" (that included Richard Pryor and George C. Scott — I guess he couldn't come up with a better category), and "dope smokers" (Cheech and Chong, in a rare moment of accuracy). To have someone be called all three was a hat trick I couldn't resist.

I never felt I missed out on anything by realizing his contributions so late. Paying closer attention to his Beatles material in contrast to Paul's made him my favorite Beatle after a few spins of *Revolver*.

There was a bounce in my step as I walked past my stepfather with *Double Fantasy* in plain view, daring him to say anything.

The lightness of youth was forever replaced with sadness at the unfairness of the universe when I listened to it. I realized in horror that, though Lennon had been silenced, Yoko's

I was 15 years old the day Elvis Presley died. It was August 16, 1977. We were on summer vacation in Virginia Beach. Dad was driving, Mom rode shotgun, and I was in the back seat with my younger siblings. Somebody on the radio announced that Elvis had died, and my mother started crying. I remember thinking how weird that was. How strange that someone could actually mourn the death of a person they didn't even know. I kept asking her what the big deal was, and she kept waving me off from behind her tears. I figured it was probably some silly female thing.

At 15, one doesn't realize the degree to which the right music can affect a person. At 15, one cannot hear a song that brings him back to when he was 17. At 15, I was still listening to the Monkees and the Partridge Family and a good four or five months away from being turned on to the Beatles, my first true obsession.

It was probably "I Wanna Hold Your Hand" or "Please, Please Me" that got me started on the mop tops. Then I went and bought the red album, the blue album, every album I could get my hands on. For each birthday, I requested Beatles albums. Every Christmas I demanded, "More Beatles." After I exhausted the entire Beatles library, I dove into the solo stuff.

Paul and Ringo and George's music were fine, but Lennon was different. Lennon infected me. His lyrics, his composition, his delivery, his politics — it all just made you feel like you knew him personally, that he was a great friend who was too busy saving the world to return your phone calls.

It was fitting that I learned about John Lennon's death the same way Mom heard about

Elvis — on the radio, in the car. I was riding shotgun with my metalhead friend Paul driving. Paul didn't give a flying V about John Lennon or the Beatles. He couldn't understand why I was getting all sloppy and moist about it. (It would be years before his metal heroes would start dying off.) I thought of my mother then, thought about what she was really crying over when Elvis died, thought about what a twerp I was to her, thought, "Man, 15-yearold sons can be such jackasses to their moms." I hope when she reads this she realizes how sorry I am for that.

Anyway, we held a wake in his honor that weekend. It was me and some friends drinking beer and smoking pot, listening to Lennon records and pointing out his brilliance, and I can honestly say it wasn't just an excuse to get drunk. We were eight or so friends commiserating



I was at Morin Heights, a recording studio an hour north of Montreal, working on the song "Witch Hunt" for the Moving *Pictures* album the night he was shot. It was a very heavy moment, I recall. I think we were all just stunned. I remember constantly going back and forth, from working to the TV, to try to get some news. If I remember the environment, looking around the room, my memory just shows me a lot of pale faces staring at the tube. – Geddy Lee, Rush bassist and singer, on www.salon.com

I was 18, a few months out of high school. It's odd that this was before CDs, iPods, cell phones, commercial space travel, and \$3 gallons of gas. Sometimes 18 still feels like just the other day.

* * *

Growing up, I was a music fan and, therefore, a Beatles fan. Paul was my fave, but John, George, and Ringo were right behind. A local TV showing of A Hard Day's Night I caught as a tenyear-old in 1972 (thanks, Bob Dale!) inspired me to form a band. How could anyone watch the closing segment and not want to be a musician?

The night Lennon was killed I was in the dining room at my parents' house when I overheard the news. For me, it's a moment frozen in time, as clearly recalled as this morning. I wasn't paying attention to the TV in the background, but I caught his name among the football hoopla. The report seemed surreal, impossible. The phone started

ringing from friends wondering if I'd heard. I was such a big fan of Lennon's music that even friends' parents called.

That night, I just sort of lay in bed and thought about the murder and what a waste it was. Like

everybody else, I listened to his songs. It was very depressing. I pulled out a guitar and absently played every halfremembered Lennonrelated guitar lick I could recall. Every so often something happens

when you think to yourself, "The world just changed."

I was working at the Licorice Pizza record store in Chula Vista, and it had been a big deal when John released Double Fantasy just a few weeks earlier. The Onoless tracks, particularly "I'm Losing You," were getting a lot of in-store turntable play among the XTC and Wire platters. A label contact had let us know that a Lennon tour was being considered, so

my friend Paul F. and I had engaged in an ongoing debate over how the tour might compare to the "Wings Over America" show a few years prior.

The next morning, I headed to work a bit



early, just antsy to get out of the house. I was surprised to find a long line of people waiting at the door to buy anything with the voice, face, or guitar of John Lennon. People were in shock; a few were in tears. We opened up early and within the hour had sold every last Lennon-related item: albums, singles, tapes, buttons, posters, the works. This was back in the day when record stores were everywhere, and each store would stock two or more bins of Beatles LPs and an equal amount of their solo works. The chain sent a truck around to replenish all the stores, but we were sold out again instantly. Commerce in death, but people truly wanted it, even the horrible experi-

mental stuff like *Two Virgins*. Somebody joked that this was probably its only chance to go gold.

As a teenager, this was the first time I'd dealt with mortality. Always iconic, Lennon seemed like one of the "forever people" (as comic book kingpin Jack Kirby might say) always been around and always will be, part of the fabric of society. And if he can go, just like that, what does that mean for the rest of us?

It was just like another normal December morning in Durham, northeast England, cloudy and a little cold. I heard my dad go off to work and before long would hear my mother shout up the stairs, "Are you getting up?" But today she didn't do that, today it was "John Lennon has been shot."

I can't believe it, this cannot be right, John is there on the bedroom wall, and he looks fine, no, she must be wrong. I went downstairs; my mother said all she knew was that he'd been shot, nothing else. I tuned the radio to the BBC News and heard the newsman report that John had been shot and had died at the hospital. Didn't hear what else they'd said.

A sick feeling consumed me. I didn't know how to handle this. Of course we'd had deaths in the family, but this was different, it felt as if my youth had been torn away. My hero was gone, a man whom I felt I had known personally since 1963, a man I admired, a man who together with his three mates inspired me, made me laugh out loud, made me pick up the guitar, a man murdered by a bastard with a gun.

I recall the BBC showed *Help!* that night. I didn't watch, didn't see any of the news reports, couldn't; I don't know now how I got through the days or nights. I tried to avoid friends, couldn't discuss it — just felt raw. It was months before I could listen to John's voice without filling up and breaking down. John, who gave so much to the world, murdered for what?

Over the past few years, I've been able to visit the scene of his murder as well as Strawberry Fields in Central Park, New York. I still miss him, miss his humor, miss his music, miss what he might have to say about the world today — we can only imagine.

Lennon fans know that during his life, John had a thing about the number 9 ("One After 909," "Revolution 9," "#9 Dream," etc.). Though he died on December 8 in New York, keep in mind that because of the time difference, in England, where John Lennon was born, it was December 9.

I hadn't started growing my hair long, or playing guitar, or listening to Jimi Hendrix or Led Zeppelin, but I did like the Beatles, and I knew who John Lennon was.

It was bone-chilling cold at school, and the news about Lennon's murder spread as if it was JFK all over again — at least among my teachers, who all grew up on Beatles music as my parents had. "This is horrible," my math teacher, a guy with long hair in a ponytail, said. "This can't be possible." He asked for a moment of silence in the class.



We 14-year-old kids all looked at each other.

On TV, on the radio, all I heard was the song "Imagine." It became an anthem of the moment. Whenever I hear it today, I remember December 1980.

People still write about the man. In 2000, Robert Rosen published a book with Soft Skull Press called *Nowhere Man: The Final Days of John Lennon*. Rosen had acquired Lennon's handwritten journals from a disgruntled exemployee of Yoko Ono's. Ono filed a lawsuit and got the journals back, threatening legal action if they were ever published. Undaunted, Rosen wrote Nowhere Man based on his memories of the journals, calling his book "both investigative journalism and imagination" - fiction, immune from litigation. The publisher sold foreign rights that they didn't own. There was a lawsuit over royalties, and the book was pulled and then rereleased by Last Gasp in 2002

Even in death, Lennon causes controversy. — *Michael Hemmingson,*

From the time I was five years old I was spinning Elvis 45s on my all-inone phonograph. It was the '50s, and my parents encouraged me to listen to the rockabilly kid out of Memphis with the rebel attitude and the voice of a black man. I don't know if I agree with what John Lennon said — "There was nothing before Elvis" - but I do know there was something after him. When I saw three cool-looking, smiling, mop-headed guys slinging guitars and a fourth one bopping and banging on the drums, all playing and

singing together, I was witnessing a whole new kind of camaraderie that my friends and I could emulate. Who cared if none of us had ever held a guitar or beat a drum in our lives? We could pretend and, in our minds, we were the Beatles. I thought, this is the kind of fun I want to be involved in forever, I never want it to stop. And that's exactly what happened.

In December 1980, I was in my first marriage, a young father of my first child. I was preparing bottles or changing a diaper as the news about Lennon came on the TV. I didn't know how to feel about it. I guess I was in shock, but I couldn't fix an emotion to the event. It made me feel bad that I didn't feel worse about it. Everyone was talking about how awful it was and how it was affecting their lives, but I had my own life and family to think about, and all was not well in my world. I was a struggling musician, with a wife and a baby who I was not emotionally or financially prepared to take care of.

Up until John Lennon's death, I'd held on to the hope of a Beatles reunion. They were a large part of my

musical palette in terms of what I listened to and how I wrote songs. Outside of Imagine, Walls and Bridges, and Rock 'n' Roll, John's solo work with Yoko didn't excite me that much. It had been five years since his last release, and it wasn't as if I was anticipating the new Lennon album. Still, with Double Fantasy, I could understand where John was coming from, and I felt a connection to him that was more than musical. He was a family man making music, and those two things, in my mind, didn't easily go together. Yet, here he was doing it, and I drew

strength and inspiration from it in my own situation.


"(Just Like) Starting Over" was a catchy pop song, kind of retro with the Elvis vocal echo and a percussive, pumping piano. But it was the hopeful sentiments of the lyrics that spoke to me. I'd been hearing the song on the radio, but I didn't have the album until Christmas when it came as a gift from my mom to my wife and me. She hoped it would provide some marital therapy (John and Yoko kissing on the front cover) for our disintegrating relationship.

That's when it hit me — the combination of holiday stress, trying to hold my family together, and John's death were just too much. Here was one of my heroes, a Beatle, who had gone astray, conquered his demons, and come back to his family and his music, a true rock 'n' role model for rock 'n' family guys like me, needlessly torn from his own domestic bliss and from all of us. He had achieved an impossible dream, for too short a time. That dream was now just a memory.

* * [I was] working in a club in Athens, Georgia. I was behind the counter and someone came in crying. He said, "John Lennon's just been assassinated." I went home. My nextdoor neighbor had cable TV, so we kept watching it, [waiting] for somebody to say, "This didn't really happen. He's not dead." discovering them via John's solo career. My first album was 1974's Walls and Bridges. I would listen to that album over and over. From there I picked up more of John's work and then discovered the Beatles, while everyone

else my age was listening to Cheap Trick and ABBA.

I was at home the night it happened. A friend called me. "Steve, did you see the news? John Lennon was shot!" At first I thought he was joking, and I told him it wasn't funny. Soon, I realized the awful truth.

That week I shut down. Didn't go to work; didn't talk to anyone. I sat at home with the curtains drawn, listening to his albums and checking

I was born an insomniac. Tests later revealed that when I did fall asleep, I would descend into the deepest sleep there is, one that takes normal folks three to six hours to reach — the filet mignon of bedtime. I sleep two to four hours each evening. On the evening of

in London, and I had just returned from George Harrison's home where I was helping him record Somewhere in England. I had a nap on the twohour drive home in fellow musician Ray Cooper's Rolls-Royce, so I was up for the night. The TV went blank at midnight, and I would switch the radio on so I had company in the wee hours.

December 8, I was living

The news came to London about 2:30 a.m. — John Lennon had been shot.

I was aghast. News followed that he was dead. Stunned, I thought about calling George, as I'm sure I was one of a handful of Brits who had this info. I couldn't be the one to tell him, I reasoned, and he's going to need that sleep he's getting now, knowing the British media.

At 9 a.m., I called Ray Cooper, who was coproducer of George's

album, and after a lengthy chat we decided to go ahead with the session...it might keep George from dwelling in sadness. Armed with a few bottles of wine, we arrived at George's about noon. Reporters greeted us at the main gate, standing in the rain. We sidestepped their inquiries, locked the gate, and drove up to the house.

George was white. He hugged us both and we began the day's work. We stopped three times during the next ten hours — phone calls from Ringo, Paul, and Yoko. He began rewriting lyrics to a track we had just cut the day before. In ensuing days, Paul McCartney put backing vocals on, joining George and Ringo on that track, as well as myself, the insomniac Wurlitzer pianist from New York who was one of the first to purchase "She Loves You" 16 years before.



We'd walked as far as 30th and Meade, where Ron had dropped a jacket off at a tailor he used there. Later, we figured out that's where we must have been when Lennon had been shot. I can't drive by that block now

without thinking of Lennon. When we got home, Mindy blurted out between sobs that John Lennon had been shot. We were stunned, speechless. She and Ron disappeared into the bedroom and I was left alone, reeling in disbelief. It wasn't until a few minutes later when Ron reemerged that I learned that Lennon had not


only been shot, he was dead. Mindy was inconsolable, fixated on a line Lennon sung years before: "The way things are going, they're gonna crucify me."

Later that night and over the next few days, we, like the rest of the world, watched as the story unfurled on television. None of it made sense: the killer, the



motive, the media canonization. I was gutted but felt completely detached from the public displays of grief, the constant soundtrack of "Imagine" on every TV set or radio. These people seemed to be mourning a different John Lennon than we were. Did they even know him? I remember one grieving "fan" on TV sobbing to a reporter that she loved John so much because he'd written two of her favorite songs, "Yesterday" and "Hey Jude" [both by McCartney]. You had to laugh to keep from puking.

A few months later, Reagan was shot, not by a political revolutionary but by another delusional loner with an unhealthy celebrity

New York friend, Harvey Goldberg, got a taxi from the L.A. airport to Hollywood, so after I picked up my husband Paul, we went up to the city to have dinner with him. Harvey is a wellknown recording engineer and was in L.A. on business. He had always wanted to go to the Whiskey, so after we ate at Old World, we walked down to the club for beers. They were playing Beatles songs, and everyone was depressed. Some smartass decided it would be clever to play "Happiness Is a Warm Gun," and Harvey went ballistic, yelling, "Take it off, you ASSHOLE!" We started yelling too, and then all the other patrons started yelling. Harvey said, "Screw this place. Let's get out of here." Not that I boycotted the joint, but that was the last time I was at the Whiskey.

Days later, KROC and several other stations announced that at 11 a.m. they would play no music and observe one minute of silence to honor Lennon. I drove down to the beach and parked and waited for the DJ to start the memorial. There were many cars, apparently there for the same reason I was, as everyone was crying. It was such a beautiful day — the ocean was aglitter, and I felt I was in a silent world of empathy. It was a powerful moment.

On the way home, it seemed as if no one else knew about the moment of silence or cared. To me, too many people were laughing or staring at my red eyes and the look on my face. Then I saw some guy throw a beer bottle out of his car, and it smashed against a tree. It was a rotten day. - Mary Fleener,

John Lennon was brought to the emergency room of the St. Luke's Roosevelt Hospital this evening, shortly before 11 p.m. He was dead on arrival. Extensive resuscitative efforts were made but, in spite of transfusions and many procedures, he could not be resuscitated. He had multiple gunshot wounds in his chest, in his left arm, and in his back. There were seven wounds in his body. I

don't know exactly how many bullets there were. There was a significant injury of the major vessels inside the chest, which caused a massive amount of blood loss, which probably resulted in his death. I'm certain that he was dead at the moment that the first shots hit his body.





I'd heard the news by 9:00 a.m. Jerry Garcia had been found dead of natural causes at a rehab center in Marin. A former roommate who currently lives in L.A. had called me to gloat about it, hanging up and letting the phone ring four more times in order to wake me rather than merely leave a message.

"Ha ha ha!" she jeered jubilantly. "You live in the eye of the storm. I bet they're parading up Haight Street right this minute. I bet Ben & Jerry's [the tie-dye-friendly ice cream parlor on the corner of Haight and Ashbury] is mobbed. I bet they drum annoyingly all day long. I bet CBS News calls you up for a quote any minute.

> "Better quick think of something gracious," she added, "or else you'll need to go in a witness protection program by nightfall."

> We hung up, and the phone rang instantly. It was CBS News, asking for a quote. Luckily, I came up with something. "I just wish," I said as carefully as I could, "that Kurt Cobain could have lived so long."

> > * *

Of course it's sad that Jerry's dead, at least when you consider him as a human being as opposed to as an icon. I feel sorry for his family — his three wives, four kids, and the bandmates whose gravy train will now grind to a halt without him.

But as a Bay Area native who's lived two blocks from Haight Street for more than a decade, it's difficult for me to think of him as human.

This was life on Haight Street, B.J.D. (before Jerry's Death). Any time the Dead were coming to town — or Jerry was playing solo with the Jerry Garcia Band — for a week before and after the gig: Legions of stringy-haired girls sit cross-legged at every corner, asking if you want them to wrap your hair for \$10. Equally hairy guys, the owners of sad-faced, poorly groomed, probably hungry dogs wander about asking if you

want to buy some bud. All of them blocking the pavement, 24 hours a day, going, "Spare some change, spare some change, spare some change? We need gas to go to Vegas. A ride to the Oakland Coliseum. Tickets for Sunday's show."

Need, need, need. Give, give, give. What did these Deadheads give back to my community? Mess. Noise. Traffic. Bad LSD, overpriced bracelets, and an atmosphere of fuzzy-headed dissipation diffusing itself throughout the land. Just the sight of them makes me want to yell, "Get a fucking job or go back home to your rich, white Marin County parents."

Greil Marcus says that the Grateful Dead provided a ready-made identity for young people searching for one. I don't object to that so much; that is, after all, the role of punk, goth, rockabilly, and every other form of music. It's just that I found the ready-made identity that the Dead provided to be illusory, conservative, out of touch, and — this is the real rub — aesthetically unpleasing.

What on earth was its appeal? Music notwithstanding — to my mind, the Dead were merely a competent cover band that played meandering white-folk blues — what could anyone find attractive in the smelly and passé?

The Dead are supposed to represent some hearkening back to the ideological '60s. And they do, fashionwise. (Don't get me started on the artistic transgressions of R. Crumb, Kelley Mouse, and Jerry's line of ties.) Also '60s-like, they support saving the rainforest and blind children in Tibet, two worthy issues that are, nonetheless, totally irrelevant to life in America.

Concomitantly, many Deadheads are the type of

people who act all PC and bitch about various political ills (mainly that marijuana isn't legal) but still don't bother to vote because "everyone's corrupt, maaan."

FYI, I have seen the Dead perform five times. The first time I was four years old. Pigpen went to my high school. My brother is a Deadhead.

* * *

Q: Why do Deadheads space dance?

A: To keep the flies off. Q: What's a Deadhead's favorite color?

A: Guatemalan. Q: How many Deadheads

does it take to change a light bulb?

A: They don't change it, they just wait till it burns out and then follow it around for 30 years.

Q: What did the Deadhead say when the acid wore off? A: Heeeey, this music sucks! Q: What's Ben and Jerry's newest flavor? A: Berry Jerry.

* * * My real objection to the Grateful Dead? The drugs.

Three band members' deaths in 20 years - now four, if you count Jerry - and countless other rumors, episodes, stories swirling around the band, heightening the already out-ofcontrol atmosphere of condoning that surrounds this band's "long, strange trip." How glamorous and romantic, huh?

* * *

At this point, my hatred of the Dead phenomenon has become so intense and profound that I sometimes think I must secretly love them. You know, how the things one hates about oneself are always the most repellent when viewed in other people? When I was living right off Haight Street in the mid-'80s, living my most underground, countercultural, non-consumeroriented, punk-rock life, I thought my outlook was as far removed from Deadheads' as it was possible to be. My friends and I abhorred the Deadheads who plagued Haight Street; but to outsiders, we all

probably looked exactly alike: junk-store clothing, weird hair, and so forth.

Plus, there was a similarity of purpose between the grunge and the hippie scene that even now I am loathe to acknowledge. "Our little group has always been and always will until the end..." Come off it, Gina. Who are you kidding? You and your punk-rock pals were also rich, white countercultural types looking for a community to belong to. Minus the negativity and the fact that we didn't panhandle, there wasn't that much difference.

The truth is, joking aside, I feel sorry for Deadheads. I know what it's like to lose the center of your scene. And heroes are hard to find. Musically, I don't think the Dead's legacy will be all that meaningful, so they will not haunt us through the ages like Elvis and Kurt and the Beatles. But nevertheless, the death of Jerry is the end of an era. And that means today is the first day of the rest of our lives. Hallelujah!



1:00 a.m. The dyslexic hour. Words on computer monitor start to run together. Squinting. Brain tired. Slumping. Sleep summons. The house has been quiet for hours. My favorite time of day, my "afternoon." Quiet time. No phones ringing. Work time. Click off the word processor. Enough. Check doors. Turn off

lights. Get under sheets.

2:00 a.m. Stare into darkness. I was raised in this house. It has always felt good to be here. It feels different now. I'm downstairs, in what we used to call the basement. My bed sits where the pool table was. Those days were fun. Family. Friends. Band rehearsal. Burgers. Pool. Rock and roll. Laughter. It's quiet now. No one's laughing. Quiet.

2:30 a.m. Overhead, on the other side of the ceiling, is a bedroom with a stranger in it. Her name is Esther, but her official title is The Caregiver. A nice, older woman with sad eyes. Down the hall from her is another stranger. Her name is Angela, but I still call her Mom, even though she no longer understands the word. She has Alzheimer's. Not long ago, Mom owned rental units, ran this household, traveled the world, chaired organizations, spoiled her grandchildren, loved life. Now, she can't dress herself. She reaches for things in the air that aren't there, mumbles gibberish at invisible objects of concern on the floor. I've moved in to put a steady hand

into the caves at Altamira. Later, I found her

purse in the freezer. During lunch, she sud-

denly laughed and asked me, "Remember



Mom's "friends" keep calling to ask how she is. A dozen times a day I explain the situation to people I've never met. No one says, "If there's anything I can do..." People have heard about Alzheimer's. They keep a convenient distance.

3:30 a.m. Turn on light. Might as well do some reading.

3:45 a.m. Realize I've read the same opening paragraph over and over. Turn off light. Dog stops barking. Now a new noise. A humming. It gets louder. Somewhere near my face. I swat at the sound, and my hand hits something. The humming stops. Turn off light. Humming starts again.

4:00 a.m. Didn't know I was asleep until I heard the floor creaking overhead. Footsteps. Is The Caregiver just going to the bathroom, or is it trouble? I listen. The phone rings. I fumble for the light switch and come into the living room.

"Hello?"

"I'm sorry, but your mom got outta bed, and I just found her lying by the dining room window without a stitch on. She's freezing cold, but I don't think she's hurt. I can't lift her because of this bad back, and —"

"Okay. I'll be right up." 4:05 a.m. Carry Mom to her bed. The Caregiver thinks I'm upset with her. I reassure her that although Mom keeps accusing The Caregiver of hurting her, I know it's just the Alzheimer's talking."Don't worry, I know you wouldn't hurt her." The Caregiver starts to cry.

4:30 a.m. Back in bed, staring into the darkness. Heart beating too fast. Must get some sleep. Can't work without sleep. Roll over on side. That feels better. Drifting.

6:30 a.m. Dog starts barking again. Something in me snaps. Grab robe, run outside and in one motion hoist

myself up to look over wall into neighbor's yard. "Goddamnit, SHUT UP!" Dog cowers, but something else moves in the shadows. It's the dog's owner. He's puttering around his garden at dawn. "What did you say?" he asks menacingly. He's burly, fortyish, wears the expression of a guy who's just realized the one thing missing from his life is a good fist fight.

"I told your dog to shut up. People are trying to sleep, and he's been yapping for hours." Guy snickers and puts his dog in the house. I dehoist. The Caregiver is standing behind me. "I need more sleep than this," she says. "Between your mother and that dog, I'm just not getting enough sleep."

"I know. I know."

Mom, in nightgown and mismatched slippers, sneaks up behind The Caregiver as though trying to get my attention. She looks frightened and confused. "She's trying to hurt me," she whispers conspiratorially, gesturing toward The Caregiver. — John D'Agostino

The Heroic Dope Quest

The few times I have smoked marijuana, it has made me a dull and unsociable person. I really do not enjoy the effects of the drug. I grew up in San Francisco, the herb-sack of America, and I have lived most of my 26 years within a 15-minute walk of the grimy corner of Haight and Ashbury, yet I have always remained an outsider to the marijuana culture. I can't roll a joint, I don't know how a bong works, and those scruffy potheadpeople weird me out. I confess: I am a sharp-cornered, straight-edged square.

But this spring, something inside me compelled me to leave my home and undertake what struck me at the time as a heroic and noble journey. I would travel into the scorched wilds of Baja California, to the turquoise waters of the Sea of Cortez, in quest of a secret half-kilo stash of buried marijuana.

A friend of mine named Jackson told me of the hidden weed this winter. He'd discovered the salty green brick about five years ago, washed ashore on a desert island in the southern half of the Sea of Cortez. Presumably it had fallen overboard from one of the many drug-running skiffs which motor back and forth between Baja and the mainland of Mexico. Jackson was in the midst of a long kayaking journey when he found the weed, and as a diligent smoker, he carried it with him for several days while he traveled south. As he neared the great port of La Paz, however, the fear of getting caught in possession of so much contraband overwhelmed him. One morning, before breaking camp, he sealed the weed in a large Tupperware container and buried it on a bluff overlooking the sea.

The notion of seeking out this treasure crept into my head a few days after Jackson told me his story. Such a journey would be a fine way to pass another month or two of my slowly

puttering life, in which I held no permanent job or any financial obligations to woman or child.

One evening in late February, I asked Jackson to draw me a map. He recalled the local geography of the secret place from his memory, and in just moments he sketched out a wonderful little treasure map, with all the elements of a classic adventure — a tropical sea, a desert wilderness and, of course, the buried treasure. Using his pen as a pointer, Jackson lectured me.


"You're going south past the vil-

lage of Agua Verde right here, past this little ranch, two more arroyos. At the mouth of the second arroyo is the weed. It's at the south end of the beach, up on the bluff. It's at the base of the biggest mesquite tree you'll ever see. I buried the weed in a cairn of rocks, and it should be right...about...there." He drew a cross on the map and said, "X marks the spot."

I rode to San Diego on March 4, sitting beside a stranger I met through a Craig's List rideshare posting. He was a businessman of some sort, and he told me everything about his investments and holdings and dividends and, well, I soon stopped listening. I felt bad for him, since he was a weekend commuter and had to go back and forth 500 miles between his job and his home, while I was free to go to Mexico on a whim and look for buried treasure.

We arrived in San Diego in midafternoon, and I crossed the border into the hot, fuming filth of Tijuana, where an army of cab drivers waited.

I said "No, thanks" to dozens before I reached the bus station. For about 20 dollars I purchased a ticket for San Quintín, 200 miles south on the Pacific coast, and then I camped for the night, there in the shrubs just off the highway. At sunrise I walked to the local gas station, where I waited around with a cup of coffee, talking in rusty Spanish to the drivers heading south. After just thirty minutes I picked up a ride with a trucker bound for La Paz. I rode with him for more than 400 miles, all the way to the green oasis town of Mulegé, where he let me out at about 4 p.m.

The marijuana still lay 100 miles farther southward. Baja's main highway passes within 30 miles of the secret spot, in fact, and I could very well have taken the bus - or hitched — almost all the way to the dope stash. But I have read many classic books of adventure by such authors as Robert Louis Stevenson and Homer, and I have learned through my studies that heroic odysseys tend to rely more on foot travel and boats than on public transportation. I believed that this journey of mine was a heroic odyssey, if ever such a thing has transpired in the realm of modern travel, and so I decided I would commence southward from Mulegé by the power of my legs.

I walked through the dusty streets of the small town, past rustic homes and bougainvillea gardens, in the shadows of tall mango trees and date palms, and then two miles along the estuary until I reached the beach on the Sea of Cortez. There I set up camp under a sandstone cliff. The town center was far away and there was no one around to bother me. Down the cobblestone shore was a lighthouse on top of a rocky promontory, and just beyond was the entrance to the estuary.

I went snorkeling that evening with my five-footlong pole-spear. The water was 70 degrees or so, and after 20 minutes, I was just beginning to shiver when I perceived a large halibut 10 feet below me, not quite concealed under the sand. I took a deep breath, descended upon the fish and speared it through the head.

I would eat quite a few halibut in the following weeks, as well as delicacies like scallops, lobster, and snapper.

Mainly, though, I would eat such lesser species as mullet, chub, triggerfish, and various members of the pitiful but delicious grunt family.

As I grilled my fish fillets that first evening on the beach, I watched the local fleet of fishing skiffs arrive at the mouth of the Mulegé River and beach themselves like sick whales inside the estuary. From the distance, and through the tangles of mangrove trees, I could see the fishermen filleting their catch on the shore as flocks of squawking gulls swarmed in on them.

The geography of the Mulegé region presented a slight problem for me as a foot traveler. Immediately south of town runs the long and narrow Bay of Concepción, 30 miles from north to south and heavily developed with homes and resorts along the shoreline. I did not care to see that region. However, the bay is defined by Point Concepción, a long and narrow wilderness peninsula which finally tapers into the sea four miles straight out from Mulegé. That barren finger of land was where I wanted to begin my long trek - but I would need a ride to get there, and one of those fishermen would have to be it.

So at dawn the next day, I walked back toward the village and inquired at the door of the first house I passed about finding a boat ride. A little old lady with hands covered in tortilla dough directed me to the home of a nearby fisherman. He lived around the corner from her, up a slight hill and past the small church, in a humble stucco home with beautiful olive and fig trees out front. I knocked and the old man answered. We spoke on the doorstep while his kids and wife peeked out at us from the shadows inside. The fisherman and I chatted in Spanish, and in just five minutes the arrangements were made. We would leave in the morning at 8 a.m. Ten dollars — or 100 pesos — was the price, and he was to dump me off at the end of Point Concepción as he headed out to sea to throw his harpoon at hammerhead sharks and manta rays alongside the rest of the Mulegé fleet. We shook

hands on the deal and parted.

The boat ride took 20 minutes. The sea was flat as glass, and we moved at 30 miles per hour. We traveled around the point to the far side of the peninsula. I took a look behind us and saw the distant greenery of Mulegé disappear behind the land. We motored up to a quiet sandy beach, and we both climbed out over the bow. I unloaded my pack and my three gallons of water, then unfolded my AAA road map and spread it over the sand. I have a fair bit of sense in my head, and I asked the old man, who spoke not a lick of my own language, where I would be able to get more water.

"Are there any fishing camps along the shore?"

"Not for 40 kilometers," he said. "But look: This is Three Palms Beach," and he pressed his old leathery fingertip into my map. "You will find water here."

He said I would easily recognize the beach by a small cluster of date palms, and that I would find a natural spring just 30 feet from the sea.

"The beach is only six

miles south of here," he said. "You will arrive tonight. It is like paradise; there is all the water you can drink, and fish to eat."

He then warned me darkly that in the remoter regions of the Baja coast, drug traffic is heavy and one must be careful to avoid hidden caches of marijuana and cocaine.

"Lots of drug smuggling around here," he said. "Do not investigate suspicious trash on the beach. Be careful."

We wished each other well, and I handed him the money and shoved him off from shore. He revved the outboard and shot away to the northeast. He left me utterly alone, a feature in life which I enjoy, and I commenced southward with a happy bounce in my step.

I felt no danger from drug traffickers on this lonely coastline, and I eagerly inspected all the suspicious beach trash I came across. I found no contraband, but I had a wonderful time. To my provisions I added three full cans of Coke, a half bottle of rum, some shoeshine polish,

a tube of wetsuit glue, a pair of aviator sunglasses, a faded dollar bill, and even some bottled drinking water. I found, too, a face mask of the sort worn by mountain climbers and bank robbers. I decided that Mexican drug runners must use them, as well.

That first day out I stumbled upon the beachside grave of a very lonely dead man. A wooden cross marked the spot. The grave was old and the cross toppled over, but the man evidently still had some good friends among the living; numerous candle jars and tequila bottles had been laid on top of the rocky mound. Still, the man was dead, and this troubled me.

Travel was grueling. The beaches were long and of shifty cobblestones. Every step I took required two or three times the energy required to take just one step along civilized surfaces like sidewalks and carpeted hallways. And when the tide came up against the cliff faces, I had to contend with hundred-yard stretches of waist-deep water, where waves sloshed and tugged at me and small stingrays lay stacked like booby traps over the sandy patches.

around a bend in the shore and saw several large palm trees. I counted six of them, yet I knew that this had to be Three Palms. The beach was lovely, with sand to sleep on and a rocky reef just off the shore where I could hunt fish. I saw plenty of driftwood to burn, and a few large stones that I could turn into seats and tables. I took my load off and wondered how long I might remain in this paradise; this would depend upon the spear fishing and the shellfish foraging — but I was ahead of myself. I needed first and foremost to find that spring.

I never did. Three Palms Beach runs for just 100 yards between rocky bluffs, so there was not much area for me to search. Yet I found no sign of the gurgling fountain of life. I inspected the roots of the palm trees at the base of the sandstone cliff and found the earth wet and sticky. But I looked and looked and the spring itself was nowhere to be found.

noon, I drank the very last of my water. The temperature was about 95 degrees in the sun - there was no shade and the terrain of arrovos and high bluffs was punishing. Whether I rested or walked, I sweated profusely, and with eight more long miles still remaining before the village of San Sebastian, I considered myself virtually doomed if I could procure no water before then. I wondered if startled drug traffickers, stumbled upon as they filled their skiff with contraband, would shoot me or save me. I hoped for the latter and pushed onward.

By a great turn of luck, I encountered a small, ramshackle fish camp late in the

afternoon. Goats milled about inside a small wooden corral, several boats lay beached on the shore, and four fishermen lounged on cots in the shade of a palm-thatched palapa. Half a dozen mangy mutts of unknown lineage took notice of my intrusion and began to circle me and bark savagely. The men awoke, rubbed their eyes, and threw rocks at the dogs. This quieted the animals and sent them back to their daybeds of rusty cans and dirty diapers.

The men, too, seemed stunned by my sudden presence, but they did not growl and bite at my heels; they were courteous gentlemen. I smiled bashfully and shook my empty milk jugs, and their faces lit

"Water!" one said in alarm, and he leaped to his feet and led me straight to the kitchen shack where there sat two 50-gallon drums of well water and a length of rubber hose. I siphoned my bottles full and drank my fill. The hour was late, and the men invited me to eat fish for dinner with them and sleep on their beach. I accepted and we had a fine evening. Their wives, children, and the dogs joined us around the outdoor wooden table. The ambience was rustic and charming, with old nets and trash strewn carelessly every which way, and the meal was genuine and delicious. We had coffee first, with mesquite honey and fresh goat's milk. Then came locally caught yellowtail, seared on a hot skillet, seasoned with oregano and paprika and drizzled with Mexican olive oil. On the side were dishes of creamy refried beans, tortillas, and sliced goat cheese made that very day. As the sun set and the women went to clearing the table, the fishermen and I opened a bottle of fine cognac — or was it cheap mescal? Yes, yes, I remember now; it was cheap mescal.

The liquor was powerful medicine for my aching body, but even stronger was the weed that we smoked on the beach after dark. The youngest of the fishermen — hardly more than a teenager — produced the joint from his pocket, lit a match and set the joint alight. He handed it right over to me, and I balked at the sight of the thing. I had been anticipating the day when I would take a seat under the great mesquite tree all by myself and light up a joint of Jackson's buried treasure, to smoke at my own pace in the solitude of the desert. I had not taken a hit in years, and these sudden circumstances caught me totally off guard. "Go on," the young man

goaded, for his joint was burning away in my fingers.

Well, why not, I thought; it's just a harmless herb. I took a long, deep hit, for I recalled a man once telling me that Mexican marijuana is weak as tea — but this weed was amaz-

ingly potent. As the men took their own respective hits and kept the joint moving, I abruptly reeled backward. I stood up and managed not to fall, and I excused myself from the men's company. I heard them giggling as I staggered into the darkness and lay down beneath some palms. My head spun out of control for a few moments, and I nearly vomited. But I kept down my dinner, fell asleep, and slept soundly until sunrise.

Before leaving, we all had coffee, and I filled my belly again with well water. The men even insisted I take a baggie packed with dope for the road, as well as plenty of rolling papers. I accepted the gift out of kindness, and I fig-

ured on using the goods as barter later on, but the little baggie of weed inspired in me a curious feeling of power and independence. It was like the day I turned 21 and realized I could buy all the liquor I wanted without having to ask my older sister for help.

I really am a straightedged square. My parents raised me well inside of four sturdy walls and a trusty ceiling — they really did. Yet just a mile down the beach, the wild urge to stop and have a smoke overwhelmed me. I had my very own weed, my own papers and a lighter. I felt like I had the world in my hands.

So I plopped down in the sand, pulled out my contraband and tried to imitate what I had seen other people do dozens of times before. It was delicate work, and I fumbled with the crumbling weed and the paper for five minutes. The resulting doobie was lumpy and ill-shaped, but it held together. I lit the end and inhaled — though not so deeply as the night before and just like that I was alone on a tropical beach, smoking weed.

I went snorkeling in the clear blue water as my head buzz developed. In just six feet of water I saw a moderately sized barred snapper, or pargo, poking its head out from a crevice. Many sport fishermen claim that the barred pargo is the strongest fish in the sea, pound for pound, and from my experience I do not contest this bold proclamation. I dived down with my spear ready, and the fish retreated from sight, but I peered into the crack and saw it lodged comfortably against the rear wall. I took aim and speared the pargo in the head. It went wild and nearly wrenched the pole-spear from my grip. The fish burrowed into a deadend crevice, but its tail and torso were left exposed. I pulled out the spear, quickly took aim again and hit the fish mortally behind the gills. I floated at the surface while the pargo bled to death, then dived down once more, reached in, and pulled it out by the tail.

Back on the beach I stuffed the fish's belly cavity with garlic and oregano and grilled it whole on the fire the favored Mexican method of cooking snapper. I just

barely managed to eat it all, and the feast, combined with the weed, left me feeling so groggy and altered that I could only sprawl out in the shade of a rock ledge and read my book, Mark Twain's Life on the Mississippi. After a hazy hour or two, I resumed my southward advance. I was high as a kite, and I have experienced no greater state of anxiety than when I came around a rocky bend and saw a group of Mexican soldiers lounging in the shade of some camouflage tarpaulins 60 feet away. Several were already looking at me, and it was too late to turn and run.

The soldiers were young men, all armed with intimidating machine guns. Three of them stood and came over to greet me as I approached. They said they were camped out for a month on the beach while practicing training operations in preparation for some imaginary war.

"Ah, very well, very well," I stammered nervously. I smiled broadly and continued, "But this is a time of peace. You have a very tranquil life, no?"

They shrugged and said life was indeed very tranquil out here in the Baja bush boring, really. The effects of the weed gave no sign of tailing off, and I wanted to make some lighthearted chat and quickly get out of there, but the three fellows had me surrounded. They asked where I was from and what I was up to. They were bored silly by their own lives, and they thirsted for information from the outside world. They questioned me about San Francisco and my fantastic metropolitan lifestyle. They asked how many women lived there, and if they were pretty. Another of the fellows asked if one could easily buy weed in my hometown.

I said I believed so. The same soldier then grinned and asked if I had any weed on me at the moment.

"Of course not!" I said emphatically — and I might have believed my own lie had the soldier not dilated his nostrils, sniffed at the air, and smiled. With that I suddenly realized that he could smell the weed on me and see it in my eyes. They all could.

The rest of the soldiers, at rest among the mesquite thorns, caught wind of the

Financing available. conversation and began to stir. My face grew hot, and a sickly feeling squeezed my gut. Several more soldiers stood up and joined the convention. They, too, held machine guns, stared hard at my eyes, and grinned eagerly.

The encounter with the Mexican army turned out not as terrible as I had feared. The soldiers were harmless young men, and they good-naturedly badgered me into producing the baggie of weed and the rolling papers from my pack. They did not seize the contraband from my hands, and it dawned on me that these boys did not want to escort me in shackles to La Paz. They just wanted to smoke.

There were 12 of them, and we smoked about twothirds of the weed. Before I moved on, I gladly donated the rest of it to them as a gesture of friendship. I really didn't care to smoke any more, anyway, until that ceremonious hour when I reached the mother lode, buried under the great mesquite tree and marked by that majestic X on my hand-drawn treasure map.


The Baja California marijuana trade is prolific, and many gringos with homes on the beach have drug stories to tell. In San Nicolás, 80 miles north of the secret stash, a salty ex-pat told me of a day eight years ago when he found on the beach at dawn a skiff filled with weed, riddled with government bullet holes, and splattered with the blood of slain smugglers.

And in Juncalito, 40 miles north of the stash, another retired American man told of an incident in which a boat from Mazatlan left nine tons of weed on a nearby island for pickup. Some local fishermen promptly caught wind of the booty and went out with a trio of fishing skiffs to take it back to camp. They were caught in the act, however, and were nearly executed.

And in San Cosme, 20 miles north of the stash, a weathered Baja beach bum living out of a trailer told me of the time he fire-bombed a gasoline cache used by the local drug mob. The *federales* had been corrupted with bribes, and they arrested the gringo and locked him up in La Paz for a week.

In addition to these gringo homesteads that I found along the coastline, I regularly came across fish camps and tiny villages. Littered though they were with the

inevitable piles of fish heads, cans, and diapers, I always enjoyed the company of the nice families that I found here. A major perk, too, of encountering these settlements was the opportunity to buy goat cheese. Someone on the beach usually kept a herd, milked the animals each morning, and produced excellent snowwhite cheese on a daily basis. After tending to the matter of water, I would always ask if any cheese was available for purchase. If so, I would offer two dollars and see what negotiations might follow. My best score came in the pueblito of Agua Verde, where an old lady sold me a five-pound block of fresh goat cheese — at 40 cents per pound.

Aside from cheese, there are other products to be bought in such small and rustic places. There may be oranges, or grape wine, or fresh beef. Tortillas are a standard item, of course, but not everyone will take the time to make two dozen for a hungry stranger. Sometimes I had to walk from door to door for 30 minutes in search of a man or woman willing to mix some dough, pat the things out, and cook them on an iron skillet.

But in Agua Verde it was easy; the cheese lady made me a pile of corn tortillas for an extra buck. With my goods procured, I went diving off the beach, and I quickly speared a two-foot halibut, then made tacos for dinner. In the stillness of the evening as my fire smoldered in the pit, I glanced over the map. I was just eight miles north of the buried treasure; I would arrive the next day. I drank coffee for break-

fast, then began the final leg of my journey. I hiked inland for most of the final miles, for some severe cliffs blocked the way along the shore. Goats had worn a clear path through the hills, and the going was easy. I passed a small ranch shaded by date palms and populated by burros, but I had plenty of water, so I marched on by. I took a break at a sandy beach a mile later. Here I downshifted from my AAA road map to the handdrawn treasure map Jackson had made for me so long ago, in the land of San Francisco. continued on page 72







Astigmatism

Astigmatism is a very common vision problem that most people have a tough time describing and understanding. It is usually accompanied with nearsightedness or farsightedness. Astigmatism can usually be corrected with eyeglasses, contact lenses or refractive surgery (LASIK). Just like nearsightedness or farsightedness, astigmatism plays a role in terms of your vision. Most people who have a small amount of astigmatism may not even notice it or have a slight blur in their vision. Larger amounts of astigmatism can give you headaches or eyestrain, and distort or blur your vision at all distances.


Astigmatism is commonly caused by an irregularly shaped cornea, which is the part of your eye that a contact lens is placed on. Astigmatism occurs when the cornea is shaped more like an oblong oval football than a spherical ball, which is the normal shape. This irregular shape causes light rays to focus on two points in the back of your eye, rather than on just one. Astigmatism can be categorized as regular or irregular depending on the type of shape the cornea is in and where it is located on the cornea. Regular astigmatism is usually easy to correct but irregular astigmatism can be com-plicated and more difficult to correct, depending on the extent of the irregularity and its cause.

Usually astigmatism is hereditary, i.e. it is passed down through generations and may get worse over time. It may also result from an eye injury that has caused scarring on the cornea, from certain types of eye surgery, or from keratoconus, a disease that causes a gradual thinning of the cornea.

Treatment for astigmatism usually consists of glasses or contact lenses (Toric or Rigid Gas Permeable). Many people feel that refractive surgery cannot treat astigmatism. "You probably start feeling different within the next nine days."


"Nine days, that's great!" "Or sooner. You'll feel





Total Combat Extreme Fighting

took self-defense classes, so I had had some of the same training. When I saw my first ultimate fighting championship, I was like, 'Wow, I know that movel' and I got hooked. This was early on [over ten years ago], back when the first round would go for 30 minutes," says Diana Ocampo, co-owner of Total Combat Entertainment. On Saturday, December 10, Total Combat will host "full-contact extreme fighting" at the Cocopah Casino in Imperial Valley.

One of the headlining fighters is Alex Garcia from Brawley, California. "This kid



California. "This kid is very talented," Ocampo says. "He started out in someone's back yard or garage or something. A lot of fight-

ers train like that; it's hard to find a good training facility." Mixed martial arts fighters "come from all walks of life," she adds. "We've had a commander from the military, a couple of Marines, and a few business owners."

Total Combat is based in San Diego, but events are held at locations within Native American reservations or at the club Baby Rock in Tijuana. "We try to make sure to use the rules that the California Commission is coming out with so when it's finally legalized in California, we'll be [in compliance]," Ocampo explains. Mixed martial arts became legal in California when the Secretary of State stamped approval for a set of regulations overseeing the sport on November 28. Depending on how fast the turnaround is for licensing, Ocampo says, shows could begin in San Diego in a matter of weeks. She is scouting out venues in San Diego.

Ocampo's partner, Eric Delfierro, serves as "matchmaker." Because he pairs the fighters for events, Delfierro pays attention to an individual's strengths and weaknesses in the "octagon cage," or boxing ring. He describes Garcia as "a real explosive fighter with knockout power in both hands. He always goes into his fights as an underdog. He'll be getting his butt whipped for two rounds and then come out of nowhere and beat the guy." Mixed martial arts includes boxing, kickboxing, jujitsu wrestling, and karate.

Garcia will be fighting Adam Lynn, a grappler (or wrestler) from Aliso Viejo in Orange County. "There are so many gyms that cross train, you'll find these hybrid matches," says Delfierro. In addition to boxing, "Alex wrestled in high school and junior college and practiced Brazilian jujitsu a form of joint manipulation." Delfierro explains, "When you put your opponent in 'arm bars,' you're hyperextending your opponent's arms to cause pain and cause the opponent to quit...there are different kinds of chokes where you choke your opponent until he goes unconscious."

Ed Ratcliff, who will be fighting for Total Combat at Baby Rock on December 17, trains at City Boxing in downtown San Diego. "He's from Chicago, a real good boxer, and a black belt in karate. His mom was a black belt and got him involved in martial arts, and now he does everything," says Delfierro. "He comes out to the ring in his karate *gi* [karate uniform]. His whole game is to keep his opponents up and try to



punish the guys with his boxing. He uses high kicks to the head and likes to finish his fights standing."

Another fighter to participate at the Baby Rock event, Shannon Gugerty from Chula Vista, "finishes most of his guys on the ground by either submission or technical knockout, which is usually ref stoppage, or where the ref thinks the guy had enough or is not defending himself because he's fuzzy from getting hit on the head," says Delfierro. Then there's Chris David. "The best way to describe Chris David is: 'He's a lunatic.' His style is unpredictable. He likes to throw flying knees, flying punches, and kicks. He was an English teacher in Japan. Now he talks to himself and refers to himself in the third person."

There are five ways by which a fighter can win a match: 1) knockout (when one fighter is knocked unconscious); 2) physical or verbal tap out (when a fighter taps the mat to indicate submission); 3) referee stoppage; 4) event doctor stoppage; 5) decision (based equally on striking, grappling, and aggression). Over 30 types of fouls can be called, among them groin attacks, eye gouging, biting, hair pulling, putting a finger into any orifice or into an opponent's cut or laceration, throat strikes, pinching, and head-butting.

"There are injuries in every sport, obviously," says Delfierro. "Two months ago I punched a guy's elbow and broke my hand. It's fine now. The bone's kind of weird, but it doesn't hurt. Most guys get more injured training than they do fighting. We use four- to six-ounce gloves, and you can hit the opponent on the floor with forearms. You'll see guys get stitches every now and then. In the history of the sport, though, nobody has died. Knock on wood."

A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND | BY JERRY SCHAD

On many a late fall and winter morning, a damp, opaque layer of air a few hundred feet deep lies over the low-lying Southern California coast. By 9 or 10 in the morning, the sun "burns" through this marine-layer fog, ushering in a fine day of mild sunshine. Sleepy-eyed hikers never know what they're missing unless they seize the moment and get an early start on any coastal or not-too-far-inland hiking route that pokes above the clouds.

Southern Orange County's Laguna Bowl loop hike is perfect for such cloud walking. It begins just one-half mile from the beach, right at the edge of the city of Laguna Beach. Find a curbside parking spot at or near the east end of Poplar Street, in a neighborhood overlooking Irvine Bowl (where Laguna Beach's "Pageant of the Masters" exhibit takes place every summer).

Squeeze through a gate at the east end of Poplar Street and start up a very steep paved road. After 0.1 mile, the paved road enters a fenced watertank and antenna facility, but a steep bypass trail skirts the fenced area on the right and keeps climbing. Soon that bypass trail joins a dirt roadbed, the so-called Water Tank Road. You continue climbing, but more moderately. At about 0.4 mile and 550 feet of elevation, you enter Laguna Coast Wilderness Park property, open weekends only for now, and soon to be open seven days a week. The early-morning boundary between fog and clear air often lies at about this level. If that is the case when you're there, then the next couple of miles will be an absolute delight.

Right at the boundary between clear air and cloud, look westward (opposite the rising sun) and you may see the upper arc of a colorless rainbow the "white rainbow" — that results from sunlight refracting through water droplets much smaller than those of falling rain. Another remarkable spectacle, called the "glory" or "Specter of the Brocken," is visible whenever you can manage to cast the shadow of your own body onto a bank of fog. The ghostly specter is that of concentric rings of colored light at the spot exactly 180 degrees away from the sun. The right conditions and optical geometry may exist during the first hour or so after sunrise.

At 1.5 miles you arrive at the junction of Bommer Ridge Road (to the left) and Laguna Bowl Road (to the right). Turn right, head south along the top of the ridgeline, and enjoy vistas of the blue ocean ahead, or of tendrils of fog below,

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR:

Born in 1972, Samantha Barbas was raised in Sacramento and Seattle. "My mother is Japanese," said Ms. Barbas, on the day that we talked (Ms. Barbas was at home in Seattle and I, in California). "My mother was a pianist. She's now an accountant. My father was doing import/export work with Japan. He did some work with the film industry back in the '60s, which is perhaps how I got interested in this area."

Ms. Barbas did her undergraduate work in political science at Williams College in Massachusetts and received her Ph.D. in American history at UC Berkeley.

Between her undergraduate and graduate work Ms. Barbas lived for a year in Japan in a Zen monastery. "That's about as far from Hollywood as you can get," she said. What she did at the monastery was "cook a

"So often today she's caricatured and criticized. No one would take her seriously today, but people then did take her seriously. Her fans took her seriously; they appreciated what she was doing. They didn't think her writing was excessive

She created Hollywood gossip. She was the first person to write a daily movie gossip column in 1915. She was the first person to convince America that stars were important.

old studio system where stars were disciplined and controlled by studios. Here comes Brando. and he's cocky and so he doesn't live the celebrity lifestyle and defies what his producers want for him. ear with me here. I've been reading a book by the Italian author Roberto Calasso, whose retelling of Greek myths, The Marriage of Cadmus and Harmony, got some critical attention several years ago. I'm now reading his In-

dian equivalent, Ka: Stories of the Mind and Gods of India, which is giving me just the tools I've always needed to look at subcontinent art. Though his book has nothing to

do with art, it does help me get a loose grasp of the slippery essences of the Indian imagination. Here's an instance. Calasso is describing Prajapati, mythic Progenitor, Lord of Creatures, and antecedent of Brahma. Prajapati has physical characteristics but also represents a certain quality of mind: "Prajapati was mind as power to transform. And to transform itself. Nothing else can be so precisely described as overflowing, boundless, inexpressible. Everything that exists had been in Prajapati before." He's paradoxically a magisterial expansiveness and enfolding.

The keys to the Indian imagination are multiplicity, multi-valence, and change-without-end. Consider a painting from London's Victoria and Albert Museum: the great Goddess Devi, in her warrior manifestation (one of many) a fierce, heavily armed girl riding a tiger or lion, is shown attacking the water buffalo demon Mahisha. There are thousands of representations of the incident. In this one, Devi, astride Mahisha's back, has already struck; the beast's severed head lies on the ground, and the goddess now is contending with yet another, different demon rising from the buffalo's truncated neck. The painter rendered the emerging demon as being *pushed* by what can only be an endless series of demons under him, just waiting their turn to do evil, for this episode, like so many in Indian literature - most painting is based on lengthy, complicated foundational texts like the Mahabarata, and the Ramayana - dramatizes existence as constant strife between good and evil.

What dials Calasso's words into this story is the power of primal transformation, transformation-without-end, unchanging change, which is the nature of the world and the mind. The narrative bounty available to Indian artists over the centuries ---- stories within stories that themselves ramify into other stories involving transformations of gods and devils and creatures - makes our store of scriptural iconography that western painters have drawn on seem small and narrow. For a majestic serving of the plenitude and varieties of Indian art, have a look at the San Diego Museum of Art's current exhibition, Domains of Wonder: Selected Masterworks of Indian Painting.


It includes an amazing Devi image I'll get to in a minute that's similar to the one I just mentioned. One of San Diego's better kept secrets is that

SDMA owns one of the largest, most important collections of South Asian art outside of India. Its strongest holdings, among its

nearly 1500 objects, span the course of Indian painting from the 6th through the 19th centuries, drawn from India's

different religious traditions and local cultures. The collection is especially rich in watercolors made between the 16th and 19th centuries for rulers of kingdoms that comprised pre-modern India, Pakistan, Nepal, and Kashmir. The most prominent school of painting flourished under the Mughals, who in 1526 established a Muslim empire in India and imported Persian painters who developed an Indo-Islamic style that dominated Northern Indian art for centuries. The museum's collection is largely due to a bequest by Edwin Binney 3rd, heir to the Crayola fortune who knew that Crayola was a fortune? - who before his death in 1986 spent many years building one of the world's great collections of South Asian paintings. Dr. Binney, during his two stints on the museum's Board of Trustees, kept an office in the museum library that came to be known affectionately as "Binney's Basement Baghdad."

One Devi picture included in the exhibition illustrates a passage in the Sanskrit text, Devi Mahatmya ("Glory of the Great Goddess"): "At that time Shivaduti's fearsome laughter sent shivers down the spines of the enemy." A goddess's work is never done. She's constantly required to come to aid the gods in keeping evil at bay, and the devils, even after Devi slew the buffalo-headed demon in the Victoria and Albert picture I mentioned earlier, just keep on coming. In The Goddess Slays a Demon, she's mounted on her tiger, who is chewing away at the neck of some warrior-demon, and has the help of the female hero Shivaduti, messenger of Shiva, a principal Hindu deity often called "the Auspicious One," who embodies both creation and destruction and is the contradiction that transcends contradictions - he's a householder with wife and children; a mendicant who roams the wilderness; a phallus that impregnates the cosmos... Shivaduti, I was saying, in the lower half of the picture, draws her bow, its arrowhead inches from her opponent's breast, while also launching at his skull (with one of her four arms) a trident. A hapless non-combatant looks on, cross-eved. Another grisly combat scene, from the 16th century, depicts an episode from the Bhagavata Purana in which Krishna, always painted blue

and one of the eight avatars of Vishnu, the Hindu deity responsible for maintaining order in the universe whose avatars (human representatives of the gods) police the world of demons... Krishna, I was saying, attacks the fortress of the demon-king Naraka, riding the majestic sun-bird Garuda, and while skirmishes swirl around the central action, Krishna launches his discus that

cleaves the demon down to the pelvis, spews of purple blood, gristle and stringy flesh gushing from his banana-split torso.

The exhibition balances such raucous scenes with depictions of the quiet, sometimes amorous interludes that in the major Hindu texts usually alternate with battles. There are stately Mughal court portraits, ethereal ren-

derings of Shiva and his paramour Parvati, sensuously detailed album renderings of deer and birds, lovers' trysts, landscapes, and hunts. Many are stylized, not naturalistic, but within the stylizations artists created inventive, dazzling effects. In a watercolor commemorating a Muslim festival ("Celebrating with Fireworks") a group of women look out across waters lit with geysering golden sparklers, flowering rocket flares, airborne buttons of light, and water-lantern smoke that flows and billows like rich graywhite tresses. The most thrilling (and frequently reproduced) image, from the 16th century, The Sports of Love, illustrates a scene from the Bhagavata Purana that describes how one autumn night Krishna, stirred by the scent of jasmine, decided, as the text says, "to play." At the sound of his sweet flute, his gopis, or cowherdesses, drop everything and hurry to the river where Krishna "stretched out his arms, embracing them, touching their hands, locks of hair, thighs, waists, and bosom.'

The depiction is pure erotic indulgence. In the river's curlicues and swirls, tumbling in a diagonal swath down the picture, Krishna frolics with several beauties who clearly can't wait to get their hands on him. They plash water and toss lotus buds at one another. It's a sporty, fresh, impulsive moment fully realized, but the moment transpires in a flowing river, *as* a flowing river, which like all things is driven by unchanging change.



JOHN BRIZZOLARA

he Illinois summer heat and humidity clamped down over Chicago's West Side like a damp electric blanket. Ozone filled the air with the promise of lightning. Gunmetal clouds brooded, purple with bad intent. Merrimac Street was still. No baseball today. Aunt

Rose said it was polio season. I had already read Neville Shute's *On the Beach* and *Seven Days in May* over the summer of

1963 — or was it '64? My father had finished with them and handed them off to me. "It's time you graduated from the Hardy Boys," he had said. Still, I had packed *The Twisted Claw* by Franklin W. Dixon with the other books — only that one hidden in my A2000 pitcher's glove. I had just finished *An American Guerilla in the Philippines*, and the day's weather conspired to place me even more fully in Manila, 1942 — my cousin was the American intelligence officer here, my aunt and uncle were Japanese collaborators.

My uncle's police radio crackled with static downstairs and in our attic bedroom. My cousin Jimmy and I listened to the Ventures play "Slaughter on Tenth Avenue." The Ventures twanged the hell out of this one on their Mosrite guitars. Nothing could be cooler than this 45 rpm record, I thought. Last week I found a recording at the library of the Ventures playing live in Japan. It had "Slaughter" on the CD. I listened and found it unlistenable. What was I thinking? I thought the theme to the TV show 77 Sunset Strip was boss too.

After multiple vinyl encores of Nokie Edwards, Mel Taylor, and Don Wilson that August day...and having finished *The Twisted Claw...*

"Frank found the switch and turned on the lights. The boys looked around...on the far side of the room, armor engraved with the symbol of the twisted claw, stood on a pedestal.

"...Joe suddenly grabbed his brother's arm. 'Hold on!' he whispered. I might be seeing things, but I'm sure that figure on the pedestal moved!'"

...I closed the book, switched the turntable to 33 rpm, put on the soundtrack to *Lawrence of Ara*-

bia, and picked up a book I had found in a suburban garbage box: *The Pass Beyond Kashmir* by Berkely Mather. The difference in the writing was like a physical blow. I seem to remember a thunderclap overhead as I read:

> "...The sun was dipping down behind the high ground towards Malabar Hill, but it hadn't taken the heat with it. You could almost

see the heat. It seeped out of the streaked, yellow-washed walls of the bazaar and it made objects in the middle distance dance and shimmer. It was helped by the smoke of the little fires from the alleys that ran down toward the Crawford Market where the women were cooking the evening meal of curry and dahl and the street traders were waking from the long siesta...scratching, hawking and spitting. Ten thousand of them doing it in concert...can drown all other sounds in the two waking hours of dawn and sunset in Bombay."

The music Maurice Jarre scored for David Lean and Peter O'Toole's *Lawrence* fit the characters Smedley, Rees, and Polson and their deadly rendezvous in the Himalayas to perfection. I made it so in the geography of my 12-year-old mind. India, the Arabian Desert — what difference? I wondered what curry and dahl tasted like. I wanted to see Arabs and camels spit, hordes of Thugees and Sepoys at the Afghan frontier, scimitars and lances winking in fierce sunlight.

Somewhere around that time I had read *The Seven Pillars of Wisdom* by T.E. Lawrence. I remember enjoying it, but I could not have understood it. I couldn't make it through Lew Wallace's *Ben-Hur*, but I sat through Charleton Heston's portrayal several times. Listening to Miklos Rozsas's score while reading Harold Lamb's *Ghengis Khan* and *Hannibal* worked well. About that time, the Beatles were on transistors and hi-fis everywhere you went. I read *Catcher in the Rye* four times that year and *I Was a Teenaged Drug Addict* (author forgotten) and *Junkie* by William Burroughs — all to early Beatles singles and Dave Brubeck's "Take Five" or "Blue Rondo à la Turk." When I think of H. Rider Haggard's King Solomon's Mines, I think of early Animals records and, for some reason, Billy Joe Royal's cornball lament "Down in the Boondocks." I heard that one and the Byrds' "Mr. Tambourine Man" wafting across the still surface of Round Lake in northern Illinois in whatever summer that was. The Beatles' Revolver was in there somewhere too, and I read King of the Khyber Rifles, Sartre's Nausea (to the tune of "Is That All There Is?" — I could swear coming from my mother's bedroom as she lay in bed all of June and July of 1966). Then there was The Iliad and The Odvssev (for school, but I loved them) as well as a copy of Terry Southern's Candy I had hidden under my mattress. This latter novel went well with beef jerky and early Rolling Stones.

My father and the films *Captain Blood* and *The Sea Hawk* led me to the books of Rafael Sabatini. The unforget-table opening line from *Scaramouche*, "He was born with the gift of laughter and the sense that the world was mad," is carved not only in memory but, I later discovered, over an entrance to the campus of Yale University. The novel itself is far superior to the movie

with Stewart Granger (so wrong) and should be enjoyed with Royal Crown cola, the Beau Brummels' "Laugh, Laugh," and the Lovin' Spoonful's "Summer in the City" and "Do You Believe in Magic?" If you have the opportunity in this life, read *The Sea Hawk* and/or *Captain Blood* while listening to Erich Wolfgang Korngold's score to Errol Flynn's depiction of Peter Blood and Geoffrey Thorpe.

Another Sabatini, *The Black Swan*, concerning the lusty adventures of Captain Tom Leach and the heroic Charles de Bernis, was read, at least in part, while my mother played for my brother and me a recording of *The 1812 Overture*. Tempestuous crescendos and cannon fire

were superb accompaniment to swashbuckling scenes:

"...Again the blades sang together. He thrust high. De Bernis parried lightly, using the forte of the blade with great effect, and countered promptly. Leach beat the blade set aside in the same manner.... It plowed a furrow in his right cheek."

Anything that includes either sword fights or gunfire and read while listening to early Fleetwood Mac's "Oh Well" will almost draw actual blood.

I should include the soundtrack to West Side

Story. This was played constantly by my prescription barbiturate- and then-over-the-counter amphetamine-addled mother until multiple copies of the LPs were scratched beyond listening. I tacitly approved the knife-fight background music as long as I didn't have to sit through the visual: choreographed, flaming pirouettes and flailing wrists as the Jets apparently danced the Sharks to death.

I recall a Harry Belafonte calypso record (yes, the one with the banana song) of Mom's, which was on quite a bit, and I associate it with the failed attempt to read *Atlas Shrugged* (Mom's book). Ayn Rand's concerns were far from my own.

About that time I read Stranger in a Strange Land by Robert Heinlein, The Painted Bird by Jerzy Kosinski, a few H.P. Lovecraft stories, and later, Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas as it appeared in Rolling Stone. The Yardbirds, especially performing their version of Muddy Waters's "I'm a Man," seemed to complement Thompson's gonzo prose. Pink Floyd's first album, Piper at the Gates of Dawn, with its wonky organ and surreal imagery, suited Lovecraft, Heinlein, and almost any and all science fiction and fantasy. In the late '60s and early '70s this genre was enjoying a kind of Golden Age (the New Wave), often featuring dark, even mainstream characterization and wild punctuation.

Chicago blues rode my cheap, portable turntable while I read Dreiser's American Tragedy and Thomas Hardy's Mayor of Casterbridge for school. Buddy Guy and Junior Wells, Albert King and Ray Charles provided backup for Nathanael West. Somewhere between Miss Lonelyhearts and The Dream Life of Balso Snell, I discovered John Coltrane, Charlie Parker, Sonny Rollins, and Cannonball Adderley. Jazz proved to be great reading music, and not just for its lack of distracting lyrics - I played Nina Simone Sings the Blues all through U.S.A. by John Dos Passos, I was also smoking marijuana and so remember little of the Dos Passos

and Robin Trower, having nothing to do with each other atmospherically, but chronologically on the same page of some confabulated photo album. The Dwarf by Par Lagerkvist was accompanied by King Crimson. Charles Lloyd and Keith Jarrett played to the sound of turning pages: Johnny Got His Gun by Dalton Trumbo, Red Harvest by Dashiell Hammett, and The Long Goodbye by Raymond Chandler. A relatively late-inlife reading of Moby Dick I associate with the Kinks and the Who and their rock operas. I don't necessarily recommend the combo, but that's how it went for me.

At some point in my 20s, somewhere around Springsteen and Little Feat, Michael Herr's Dispatches, The Hack by Wilfrid Sheed, Graham Greene's Quiet American, and Anthony Burgess's Enderby, I opted to read and to write with as much silence in the background as I could manage. To this day, while writing or with an open book in front of me, if music is coming from anywhere I will opt to listen to the music. Music trumps language on a visceral level, though both are pleasures - when they're not instruments of torture. Rap and hip-hop, "the New R&B," martial or German beer-garden music, and Broadway show tunes are torment, just as awful prose is tantamount to chewing on aluminum foil. Anyway, today I will read or I will listen, but not simultaneously.

My own memoirs, when and if they are written, will best be read while listening to a recording of the highest quality and played at maximum volume — it is a composition by John Cage, usually performed live and always listed first in the program. I must find the title; I believe the word "ambient" occurs in it. For some two minutes or so, I believe, Cage sits at the piano and refrains from playing anything. Eventually the audience stops shifting, clearing their throats, and rustling programs. After the first minute these sounds give way to something as near silence as men and women are capable of this side of the grave. A silence that is attentive, expectant, possibly embarrassed, self-conscious, and pregnant. More rewarding than any memoir.

Alan Lomax claimed that he grew up in the Library of Congress — his father was curator of the Archives of American Folk Song. Together, father and son recorded thousands of hours of the music of itinerant folk singers, gospel choirs, bluesmen, cowboys, prison work gangs, hobos. Many of their subjects were unknown; some even-tually found fame, including Lomax himself. When he died in 2002 at the age of 87 he left behind a legacy of more than 3000 such recordings. Reduced to simplest terms, his lifetime was a mission to memorialize folk music. Judging by the kind of rural arts that appealed to him, he would have loved Tom Brosseau.

Being a country boy himself, Lomax might have felt kinship with Brosseau's family, the way they played music together after work.



He might have gotten a trim in Brosseau's grandfather's basement barbershop. He would have favored the Plains mentality of Brosseau's songs, the barren simplicity of his acoustic guitar renderings. He might have asked Brosseau why his songs all bear the patina of the Gold Rush or of the frontier saloon. Everything about the folk singer's act seems borrowed from the '80s - the 1880s (as Brosseau puts it). Even a recent publicity photo of Tom resembles a Civil War daguerreotype, the expression measured, the details slightly blurred, the image enduring.

Brosseau is from North Dakota. Despite comparisons to Jeff Buckley, Brosseau's music is too farm boy, too scrubbed — his prairie-home sentiments lack the baggage of Buckley's stripe of introspective emotion. But Brosseau has a thin and surprising falsetto that glides into a song without warning. He writes music that is as rugged and unadorned as a Stephen Crane story. There are no modern structures or



updated pop hooks, and therein lies the only trace of any irony in Brosseau - that he moved away, to California, to sing songs about North Dakota. Alan Lomax would have been all over that.

Sequel Feels Like A Work in Progress

"If you're not alive and kickin', shame on you!"

f you just saw the first act of Common Ground Theatre's Black Nativity, you might be astonished to hear the audience gave the show a standing ovation. Act One of Langston Hughes's African-American Christmas story takes place in

a modern gospel church. Parishioners reenact the birth of Jesus with music, including the potentially raucous "Jesus Is on the Main Line (Tell Him What You

Want)." Act One could raise rafters. But Common Ground makes every song so solemn, every tempo so passive that when Carl Hebert sings "Oh Holy Night," even though he does it well, they could rename it "Oh Holy Week and a Half."

Elizabeth Bronner provides the only graceful movement in the first part. In practically every painting, the Virgin Mary's a static figure with a sad face (because she foresees the pain her Son will suffer). Bronner's the exact opposite. Her Mary's a young woman delighted to be giving birth. She brings the Madonna to life by dancing free-form in a white, flowing skirt. Otherwise Common Ground's often stiff, pseudo-pageant acting recalls Hughes's poem "Movies." Harlem, he wrote, laughs at Hollywood "in all the wrong places / at the crocodile tears / of crocodile art / that you know / in your heart / is crocodile.'

But anyone who's followed director Floyd Gaffney's work knows he's got more than this. And his cast and live backup band have many recognizable talents (there's Dajahn Blevins; isn't that Deborah Branch?). So what gives? Uninspired Act One, it turns out, is a deliberate — and, quite frankly, too much of a trick — setup for Act Two, which jumps, hollers,

and unfurls the spirit. Where the acting in the first part rivals Mt. Rushmore, the performers in the second become spontaneous. They can't, as one says, keep their

The nine songs of Act Two resemble a baseball lineup: speed early, power deep down the middle. The piano-playing Charles Ray leads off with such a lively "What a Mighty God We Serve," you wonder if you re-entered the same theater. The cast, now dressed in white satin choir robes with red trim, leaps from church pews and sets an unbroken, jubilant tone for the rest of the evening.

After Deborah Terrell, who bats cleanup, makes her mighty, oceanic "We Shall Behold Him" a tough act to follow, Dajahn Blevins hits the ground running with "Can't Nobody Do Me Like Jesus" — and almost dares his audience to stay seated and not clap to the beat. Then Deborah Branch grabs the mike, sings "Perfect Praise," and proves she can still belt one into the bleachers.

In the second act, the performers catch up to Carolyn Cherry's four-piece backup band, which

has been cooking all night. And they rock Ted Crittenden's set: the interior of a church, backed by tall stained-glass windows and lit by Calvin Manson's warm reds and golds. It's almost as if Langston Hughes himself admonished the cast at intermission — as he did in a poem — "If you're not alive and kicking, *shame on you!*"

The North Coast Rep uses the same classroom set for *Sister's Christmas Catechism* it did for Maripat Donovan's *Late Nite Catechism.* But now the desk's piled with Christmas presents. On the floor's a cheapo plastic representation of Joseph, Mary, and the baby Jesus, lit dimly from within. Carolers sing yuletide songs. And someone wrote "It's Time to Party!" on the blackboard. The sister who substitute-taught in *Late Nite* better not see *that.*

Sister's an old-school sparenot-the-rod nun who disciplines first, then doesn't ask questions. And she's back. She bullies into the room, like a one-person crowd. She kicks the carolers off the stage. She tilts forward and peers over her glasses, inspecting students for infractions. Chewing gum? Swallow it! Sister plows into the audience with a Kleenex box and hands a woman several. Is the woman chewing gum? Nope. The Kleenex is to conceal flesh exposed by a lowcut dress ("Go on," Sister says, "cover that up!"). A latecomer sneaks toward his seat. Sister's eyes laser him, as if tardiness were a venal sin. "We'll find ways for you to repent later,' she mumbles.

Like Forever Plaid and Triple Espresso, Late Nite Catechism's a theatrical phenomenon. It's been performed across the country for years. Because it relies heavily on audience participation, no two shows are the same, and theatergoers return again and again to watch Sister — one part stand-up comedian, one part instructor in the Baltimore Catechism, ten parts autocrat — berate the unwashed.

Late Nite's become so polished, its sequel feels like an early work in progress. The ideas are in place. The first hour's a class. Sister instructs and questions students about the Christmas story, with emphasis on the Virgin Mary. She rewards correct answers with humble gifts, like coal wrapped in cellophane. The second hour's the party, which includes a "living Nativity" (audience members dress in "found" items: T-shirts, lampshades, shower curtains) and a mystery: "Who made off with the Magi's gold and left Mary, Joseph, and the infant Jesus in that lousy stable without any chance to upgrade to a suite?'

The show was funny the night I caught it. Kristin Moneagle's Sister fired off swift ad libs, and a human encyclopedia in the back row had every answer (including who created the first re-enactment of the Nativity — St. Francis of Assisi



in 1223). But compared to the original, it pales. Dressing people for the Nativity took way too long. And the tone was almost bland. In the original, Sister's all extremes: she proselytizes from the heart and critiques suspect doctrine with equal relish. And throughout she's tough love in a black robe, tapping her palm with a ruler.

Christmas Catechism's much nicer than that. The only palpable threat comes when Sister picks people for the Nativity, and nonjoiners lower their eyes or suddenly inspect the ceiling for structural flaws. The new version would probably fare better if it were the first of its kind. But compared to the original, Christmas Catechism may have too much of the holiday spirit.

others. Sean Murray's expert staging of Lillian Hellman's melodrama about lethal greed ranks with the very best. Murray accepts the play's good versus evil scheme but has encouraged acting as textured as his precisely detailed set and Jeanne Reith's elegant 1900 costumes. Rosina Reynolds heads a stellar cast as Regina. When the occasion arises, she can rival Machiavelli's prince for power grabs, but Reynolds also gives her a lateblooming conscience that complicates our responses (her haunted look, as lights dim, betrays an awareness that no end could justify the means she employed). Tom Stephenson, as Regina's sly-fox iceberg brother Ben, and Glynn Beddington, as closet alcoholic and family enabler Birdie (who will finally have her say, even if it takes all the sherry in the South), shine in supporting roles. The Hubbards' maid, Addie (deftly understated Cynthia Marie Brooks), says there are only people who eat the earth "like locusts" and people who watch. Can Regina's daughter, Alexandra, find a third alternative? She's Hellman's agitprop heroine, make no mistake. But Rachel Van Wormer fills the 17-year-old with such genuine confusion that, when she finally takes a stand, it resonates.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but San Diego Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" - five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, wrote one of the

very best books I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art." *Worth a try.*

All five are polished pros: Steve Anthony does a spectacular tap number ("When 50 Wore Tux"): Teri Ralston adds emotional depth to songs with skimpy lyrics; Susan Jordan handles the comedic chores with ease (and does a sultry samba with Anthony): David Holmes and Brian Byers always contribute. Problem is: they're much better than the material. No Resting on Laurels

'Tis the season to host relatives and friends escaping from frigid far-off lands to America's Finest City. And once they check in, what do they want first? San Diego's finest food.

Consider Laurel Restaurant and Bar, which is under new management, freshly remodeled with valet parking at last! — and within strolling distance of Balboa Park's "December Nights."

From street level, you can see down into the dining room through the restaurant's tall windows, an envy-inducing fishbowl effect that makes you want to join the folks savoring their dinners below. The new decor is sleek and handsome in off-white with black trims, including the gleaming white tile flooring (with black noslip strips) of the staircase leading down to the restaurant. If you need to wait for your group to gather, there are comfortable couches to the right and a cute little bar to the left. Huge glass cylinders filled with floating roses punctuate the space, and a double-sided banquette sets off the back third of the room - suggesting a semiprivate space for large parties while moderating the sound level on both sides. A full-size mirror hangs on the back wall, decorated with scrolled wooden cut-outs, a 3-D effect. The world-music loop on the sound system slips from North African to Cuban to jazz.

The food is equally stylish. The eclectic, everchanging seasonal menu includes flavors from France, Italy, Japan, Southeast Asia, and California, unified by a sensibility that speaks with an unmistakable Gallic accent.

We met up with the Lynnester and her friend Samurai Jim, a roving engineer whose work takes him all over the globe (poor guy). Once seated, we were immediately greeted with poached edamame (fresh soybeans) - the signature of the Urban Kitchen restaurant group that now owns Laurel. (Urban's head honcho Tracy Borkum prefers them to bread and butter because they don't fill you up before the meal. If you must have bread, you can buy a "grilled rustic" version as a \$4 side dish.)

Jim, just returned from Greece, approved of the snack plate of mixed olives, although its \$8 tab seemed a tad steep. For serious appetizers, we began with a spectacular house-smoked, cured elk carpaccio. Now I'm no stranger to elk, but Laurel's has to be the best rendition yet for

showcasing this meat's distinctive flavor and texture. The thin tenderloin slices were splayed on a long rectangular plate, topped with slivered almonds and young arugula. The meat was lean, deep red, and slightly sweet from a light

smoking over applewood, with citrus notes from lemon oil and lavender coulis. Coarse-ground black pepper kicked it up. What does elk taste like? Not like

chicken — nor beef nor lamb, nor even much like deer venison. You just have to taste it for vourself.

Kurobata pork belly was another winner. Kurobata is the Japanese name for gently raised heirloom-breed Berkshire hogs (originally from England), the porcine equivalent of Kobe beef. Berkshires have been reintroduced to American farms, but the Japanese name has stuck. A goodsized chunk of the uncured bacon arrived in a slanted-edge white bowl, mingling with small potato pancakes and shreds of dark greens. The braised meat was lightly crisped with a sweet-tart pomegranate and pasilla chili glaze. Its streaky, succulent interior tasted like honest, old-fashioned fatty pork - not that thankless "other white meat.

"Do you like escargots?" I'd asked Lynne as we worked out our order. "I love them!" she an-

swered. "I loved them so much when I was a kid that, for my 12th birthday, my mom gave me a set of escargot shells - you know

the kind, in a plastic cylinder on top of a can of snails." She also loved Laurel's out-of-the-shell treatment: Tender bits of mollusk meat, cut grape-size, mingled in a porcelain cocotte with English peas, pea purée, carrots, olive oil, and shell-shaped pasta (conchiglie), a neat culinary pun. The critters themselves weren't the least bit rubbery; I can't say as much for the pasta, but by now, potato gnocchi will have taken its place. With Laurel's ever-changing menu, any glitches are temporary.

'Crispy sweetbreads" had the look and mouth-feel of chicken nuggets, deep-fried in batter and wafted with candied "pancetta dust." I loved the roasted cippolini onions and thick

crème fraîche sauce on the side, although the combo struck me as an odd coupling of Maxim's de Paris with Mickey D's. Jim and Lynne, however, happily polished off the dish.

The wine selection ranges from carefree, oyster-friendly Muscadet (\$28) on up to great French bottlings like Château Latour '90 (\$999). We were delighted to realize that we'd serendip-itously arrived on "Sinful Sunday," when a selected list of wines are half-price. These are tag-ends from the encyclopedic wine list, with only a bottle or two left of each. For us, that meant enjoying a first-course bottle of Sancerre

(Loire) marked down from \$60 to \$30, a white so easygoing and food-friendly that both the wine-shunning guys at our table enjoyed some sips before returning to their own quaffs. For entrées, Lynne and I ordered reds by the glass; my Feraud-Brunel Côte du Rhone was all I'd hoped, her Château Robin meritage (Bordeauxstyle blend) — not quite.

"Last time I ate veal cheeks, they were too rich," said Jim, tasting our first entrée's fallapart-tender meat, the product of long and clever braising. "These are much better." My partner said, "That's because the ones you had were probably done with cream or a heavy wine sauce." Jim agreed. Here, served with a hint of a gentle jus-based sauce, the meat was bedded among roast parsnip wedges, creamy parsnip purée, and deep-fried parsnip flakes - a study in three modes of one root's piquant flavor. "Wow," I said, "next time I shop in Hillcrest, I gotta get me some parsnips, and celery root and rutabagas, too - enough with plain old mashed potatoes!" If there's any justification for the existence of winter, this dish is it.

A Wagyu (a.k.a. Kobe) beef fillet entrée offered thin,

plate-covering slices of superb beef, rare as ordered and salted just right. They were augmented with more snail meats. Alongside was a hunk of roasted parsnip and a heap of lean mashed potatoes, colored bright green from parsley puréed in extra-virgin olive oil. "This is the best Kobe I've tasted," said my partner. Jim was entranced, too. I was not that mad for the mash nor intrigued by the meat, which I found more tender than flavorful — but it was still an excellent twist on steak.

About the duck confit do I dare voice a doubt without offending the entire French nation? Confit consists of salted and herb-rubbed cutup poultry (usually duck or goose) cooked and stored in its own melted fat, then recooked in the fat to crisp the exterior. Laurel's is quite the classic version — a large leg-thigh piece with the typical hard-crusted exterior and dryish, shreddy meat, bedded atop small green French *de Puy* lentils, which are spiked with chewy, smoky bacon bites, and wisps of wilted spinach. I've tasted moister confit (just once, from a French chef at Ernie's in San Francisco), but this dish is another that's slated to change next week: The confit will play a supporting role in a cassoulet (French white bean stew), which to my palate is the best possible use for it. (All the seafood dishes are changing to winter species, too, so I won't bother talking about our selections, now offmenu.)

We gobbled through most of the desserts, enjoying them all. The smash hit was part of a "Citrus X 4" taster assortment. A buttermilk panna cotta topped with a subtle orange gelée, resembling haute-cuisine Jell-O, tasted like a Creamsicle, according to the Lynnester. We revisited it until the last scrap was gone. The other citrus offerings included a fluffy warm lemon pudding (so light it was barely there), a grapefruit sorbet, and a compote of mixed citrus, heavy on the grapefruit.

Samurai Jim picked a "chocolate tasting" that included a demitasse of old-fashioned hot chocolate topped by a mini marshmallow (his top pick), a square of molten chocolate cake, and a scoop of white chocolate ice cream (which melted away neglected). A butterscotch pot de crème consisted of white chocolate pudding flavored all through with butterscotch, rich and distinctive. You really have to be a butterscotch fan, but it grew on us. (Literally - I'm sure it added an inch to my hips.) Goat-cheese cheesecake with tart pomegranate seeds and lemon thyme was ethereal and not the least goaty, a square of fluff with tangy garnishes. Another plus for the dessert course is the choice of five different French-press coffees, each grown in a different area, including a good decaf mocha java. But if you still have some wine left, you can pretend you're in Burgundy and consider the cheese sampler before or instead of the sweets.

Good food, good wine, good people — this a good place to show off San Diego to those outlander in-laws. And after they're gone, I'll be back at Laurel.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Wine Sellar & Brasserie owner Gary Parker inherited Laurel when chef Douglas Organ, his business partner in both restaurants, pulled up stakes and left for Boston. Too busy with the Brasserie and fed up by the near-endless high-rise construction mess on Fifth Avenue, Parker put Laurel up for sale last spring. Restaurateur Tracy Borkum, owner of Chive, Kensington Grill, and Urban Kitchen Catering, reputedly paid a million for it, and plenty more to renovate it. Now the construction is gone, renovations are done, and Laurel looks like - a million bucks.

Under the overall aegis of Urban Kitchen's Provenceborn executive chef Fabrice Poigin (previously at Bertrand at Mr. A's), chef Amy DiBiase heads Laurel's kitchen.

"I've always worked in restaurants," she says. "I grew up in an Italian family, so food was always around. My grandfather owned a little clam shack in Maine, and on my mom's side, my mom and my aunts were all general managers at restaurants. So I was a little restaurant rat, growing up. I was in the back of the kitchen hanging out with my mom, I'd get stuck doing little jobs, like, I'd be over with the guys portioning meats or bagging things for them, or doing silverware, or helping my mom with her paperwork. I remember counting [cash register] drawers with my mom when I was 15 years old. It was a really good background in the reality of restaurant work A lot of people come out of culinary school, never working in a restaurant, and they're just sometimes they've spent all that money on school, and when they start working, they just can't handle it.

"Right out of high school I went to Johnson and Wales Culinary School in Rhode Island. Jason Schaefer [Laurel's former executive chef] came from there, too. Right after I graduated I was researching San Diego. (My parents have been living in North County for about 12 years now.) I was going to go to the Hyatt in La Jolla, but I read about this restaurant and about Douglas Organ's reputation, and I came out here to try and get a job at Laurel. And I got here a month after Doug left. It's funny, I moved here from Providence when he moved to Boston. Jason had just gotten promoted, and he hired me.

"I've been at Laurel for four years. I worked my way up, starting as a line cook. I worked under Jason and then under Mary Jo Testa. When she left, I was given the opportunity to be chef de cuisine. I was running the kitchen for a little over a year by myself.

"The way Fabrice and I work together is, he'll have his ideas and I'll have my ideas, and then we'll have meetings together and try to integrate both our ideas, coming up with the dishes together. Most of the dishes, it's both of us."

I asked who made the desserts. "We don't have a pastry chef. I've got two girls here, 19 and 20, right out of school. One of them, it's her first job out of culinary school, the other was a pastry chef in Vegas. They work with Fabrice — he hands them the ideas, and they try to work through it."

"We're working to get the menu as solid as possible.... We're going to bring back the tapas sampler; we're working on that now. For the winter fish, we're going to have Arctic char and Atlantic cod from Bar Harbor, Maine. We're putting in a cassoulet, a venison chop instead of the lamb, and a new presentation for the beef fillet. I just hope that the local people understand and like what we're trying to do."

onest! It's just like you're there, chasing the bad guys in the skies over the Middle East," said Hank the other day. "It's incredible."

I kind of "yeah yeah'd" him. And forgot about it.

But now — funny how things coincide — here I am, passing the Navy Pier. I can't help thinking, Hmm. Might be a kick to try it, just once.

So I walk up under the shadow of the USS Midway, this truly ginormous whale of an aircraft carrier, and now I'm anteing up — *ow!* — 15 bucks to get aboard.

The hangar deck is cavernous. They've got planes and exhibits and guys in flight suits standing by flight simulators. But I keep walkin'.

"Watch out, there's two kinds of simulators," Hank had warned me. "The ones where you actually 'fly' the plane cost around \$40. You want the one where you don't. 'Cause, man, that one actually moves, throws your butt about. It's something else. Plus, it's only six bucks.'

Ah. Here it is, the "Navy Flight Simulator." A white "blind" cockpit sitting on six pneumatic rods, promising an operation over enemy desert territory. I go up to the counter, just as this guy in a flight suit sets up a little sign.

"Back at 2:30."

What? But...?

"Lunch," he says. And he's gone.

Which in a way is lucky, because I'm feeling



peckish too. "Do they have, like, mess rooms here?" I ask another guy collecting audio-guides. "No, but we have the Fantail Café, out on the, uh, fantail.'

"The deck overlooking the stern.'

"Oh right. Yeah. Of course. Which way is the ...?' 'That way, through the sou-

venir shop.² Hey. What a surprise. An on-

board café, just below the actual flight deck. It hangs out over the

water at the shore end. Place has a yellow canopy, a dozen polished metal tables, ten big Old Glories fluttering over the stern, and hurricane wire-mesh fencing to make sure we don't fall overboard. It's a long way down to the sparkling blue waters

You get to the counter 'round one huge windlass that has "115,000 Pounds as a Bit" written in raised iron on one side. You can just imagine it winding mega-ropes slowly in, pulling this ship into, say, her old homeport of Yokosuka, Japan. "I can serve you now," says Sarah, the gal at

the counter. Uh, right. Actually, the choice is not that huge, but

hey, this is a snack bar on a Navy carrier, not a fivestar cruise ship. They have sandwiches, like oven-roasted turkey with lettuce, tomato, and cheese, or roast beef, or Black Forest ham (this comes with green apple slices to sex it up), all the same price, \$7.95. Three-cheese

pizza, nine inch, is \$8.95. A chicken Caesar salad with Parmesan cheese goes for \$8.95, and a bowl of beef chili is \$5.95. Not the cheapest, but on the other hand, for tourist-trap fare, waddaya expect?

The "smokehouse roasted brisket" on a hoagie roll could be interesting. It's \$8.95. They have a "Tomahawk" hot dog for \$6.95. Add chili for a buck more. Everything comes with half a plate of chips.

"Most popular? Probably the American halfpound Angus Burger," says Sarah. That's \$8.95. I notice the two Chinese characters tattooed onto her lower right arm. "One's 'dragon,' " she says, "because I was born in the year of the dragon. The other's 'loyalty.' Because I'm that kind of person.... Or how about the hot pastrami?"

I get the burger and a coffee (\$2.00, \$1.00 refills) and go find a table with a view. Look out the stern, and there, like ships steaming toward you in a battle line, I see downtown's high-rises. Look south, and Seaport Village, Coronado, and Mexico pop up like postcards.

This was the spud locker down here on our carriers," says Bill Hall. He and his daughter Cathy are splitting a ham sandwich. Her son Chris, 28, is eating an Angus Burger. Grandfather Bill, turns out, was a carrier fighter pilot.

"I was on the Philippine Sea, and then the Val-

ley Forge. We would come in with our wheels 15 feet above the spudlocker deckhead, cut power, and just drop onto the deck. Hit the spud locker, you'd ruin everybody's dinner.'

He's come to show Cathy and Chris what it was like back then, when he was four years younger than Chris is now. "I flew Panthers, Corsairs, and Sky Raiders," he says. "This was the time of Korea. We sometimes took AA 50-caliber fire. You'd see the black smoke puff...

Now here's the problem. I got my halfpounder burger, loaded with the hot patty, cheese, tomatoes, red onion, the works, plus an ocean of chips, all on a black plastic plate. I gunked ketchup and mustard in and chowed into it. Things were hunky-dory. Then I got talking with Bill. We were just at the part where the bullets ripped into his wing tank, when — whack! — I look up, my hamburger's gone. So's my coffee. Disappeared. Server must have whisked them off to the trash.

I'm about to make a big fantail fuss, except that it's 2:30, and I have a rendezvous with the skies over Iraq on the other side of the souvenir shop.

I get there. Another group's already flying a mission. Man! Just watching the way the six pneumatic rods toss that cabin around, I'm kinda glad I don't have a full stomach. ■

The Bubbly Backstory

"No one noticed that not a single paper or speech specified what Perignon had really done."

ong before the First World War nearly destroyed Champagne as a winemaking region, another war gave birth to it: the First Crusade, launched by Pope Urban II in 1095. According to Don and Petie Kladstrup's

book Champagne: How the World's Most Glamorous Wine Triumphed Over War and Hard Times, the First Crusade set up the Champagne region to be the great marketplace at the crossroads of Europe's major east-west and north-south trade routes. It also facilitated the transfer of vine-

yards to the Church (by way of the Crusaders' wills), after which they were cared for by monks, "the true oenologists of the day."

That set the stage. But Champagne did not begin making the jump from wool region to wine region for another century or so. What happened? Marketing. Marketing has been Champagne's genius "from the very beginning," said Petie when we spoke, "when it was a wooltrading place, and they decided, 'Well, maybe we can entice one or two extra merchants if we offer them a little bit of free wine.'"

If bubbles are what Champagne is famous for, it's marketing that has made Champagne famous. It comes as small surprise that Champagne was the first product advertised on a poster, and I can think of few things so firmly wedded in the consumer consciousness as Champagne and




celebrations — maybe diamonds and engagements. Exhibit A: In 1867, a US consular officer named Robert Tomes published a book entitled *The Champagne Country*, in which he recounted, among other things, a visit to the city cemetery.

After beholding stones bearing names such as Heidsieck and Clicquot, he remarked, "I had never thought of those jolly names, so associated with gaiety, weddings, feasts, and merrymakings, being crowned with death's heads and bloody bones."

Those bubbles make a splendid example of the region's marketing genius. The monk Dom Pierre Pérignon did much to improve the quality of winemaking in Champagne. He did not give bubbly to the world. Yeast gave bubbly to the world, and Dom Pérignon fought it all his life. But Champagne after World War I needed a champion, and the good monk was a fuzzy enough historical figure that the Champenois could graft a history onto him without much objection.

They decided to honor the "250th anniversary of Dom Pérignon's 'invention' of sparkling Champagne" with a three-day party. "There were papers by leading scholars and speeches by government officials," reports *Champagne*, "all rendering homage to Dom Pérignon's genius. There was also a lot of Champagne poured, so much, in fact, that no one noticed that not a sin-

gle paper or speech ever specified exactly what it was Dom Pérignon really had done. But none of that mattered. The celebration achieved its purpose. Sales of champagne soared and Dom Pérignon became the man of the hour."

The previous century had seen marketing help transform Champagne from a sweet wine to a dry one. Louise Pommery led the way, though she was following her customers when she made the switch; she'd heard the rumblings from across the channel. "Champagne was trying to distinguish itself," said Petie. "England was the chief customer, and England already had so many sweet wines — Port, Madeira, Sherry. Champagne was trying to figure out a way to make itself unique, and also, if the wine was dry, they could sell it as something to drink throughout the meal."

These are the tame stories. There are better ones — Champagne at society orgies, Champagne bootlegged into America, Champagne smuggled through Russia ahead of invading armies. You'll have to buy the book for those, because I want to get back to the Kladstrups' central



theme: the intertwining of war and Champagne. Even here, amid the ravages of war, marketing exerted its influence. After Napoleon's defeat, Russia, Prussia, and Austria all invaded France. Champagne became occupied territory, and the producers' cellars were plundered. But Jéan-Remy Möet, we learn, "remained sanguine through the worst of it as he recalled an old French proverb: '*Qui a bu, boira*' (he who has drunk once will drink again). Jean-Rémy was convinced, as he told friends, that 'All of these soldiers who are ruining me today will make my fortune tomorrow. I'm letting them drink all they want. They will be hooked for life and become my best salesmen when they go back to their own country.' He was right.'

Whatever else has changed in Champagne since the wars - the trend towards corporate ownership being the most obvious shift --- the importance of marketing has remained the same. Said Petie, "The incredible success of Champagne advertising is a reflection, in a way, of the idea of working together. It comes out even now. When we were talking to various Champagne producers about publishing the book, you could almost guarantee that one of the first phrases out of their mouths would be, 'Well, we want to make this a Champagne-wide event. We don't want to stress one brand over another.' They are very, very conscious of the idea that they sink or swim together.'

To that end (at least partly — surely a devotion to quality is also at work), Petie said that "There are more regulations in Champagne than anyplace else. I think it's the most strictly controlled wine in the world. One of the great dramas it's facing right now is that

the Champagne growing area is planted to the maximum. If demand keeps growing, what do you do? Do you decide you can open up other land for planting grapes, and perhaps reduce the quality? Or do you raise the prices? That's the great discussion." Added Don, "And the Champagne community is sharply divided, with one side saying, 'You're going to destroy the image and the quality of Champagne if you go further,' and the other side saying, 'There's a market for it, let's expand the boundaries.

In parting, Don offered this, the latest relation of war and bubbly, and a final testament to the power of marketing: "Even today — as Americans were boycotting French products be-cause of the war in Iraq, and especially French wine, the one exception to all of this was Champagne sales. While everything else plummeted, sales of Champagne actually increased."

Petie chimed in, "One producer said, 'People who drink Champagne don't boycott.'"

Potato Shack Cafe 120 West I Street (off South Coast Highway 101), Encinitas, 760-436-1282. Check out the cute potato-toon mural on the side of the building - a sign for spud-lovers to load up on portions sized for lum-berjacks from The Lumberyard across the street. American fries (served "All you can eat!"), French fries, potato patties, and baked potatoes with various toppings are the heart of the menu, along with eggs, omelets, biscuits with sausage gravy, and beer-battered onion rings made from sweet reds. If size counts, consider the daunting inchthick "manhole" pancake that's bigger than the plate. Lunch runs to "deli" sandwiches (with potatoes), or a hearty bowl of chili con carne. Arrive early weekends. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — N.W. (10/01)

Ruby's Diner 1 Pierview Way Oceanside, 760-433-RUBY (7829). One thing about Ruby's: You can build an appetite just getting there. It's at the end of the 1/3 mile-long Oceanside pier. (There's a 50-cent electric wagon, too.) Ruby's is part of a themed "forties diner" chain stretching from LAX to Scottsdale, Arizona. But it's still fun Shiny Chevy Corvette-style red leatherette and chrome booths, white walls, portholes, old Coca-Cola signs, "Dewey-Warren" presidential buttons, and that view to Hawaii. And pretty darned good-sized servings too, from omelets to the "Super Burger" with Swiss cheese and avocado on a grilled Parmesan sourdough bun. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/01)

Savory 267 N. El Camino Real, Encinitas, 760-634-5556. Chef-owner Pascal Vignau was executive chef of the Four Seasons Aviara when he decided he wanted his own little place. His casual strip-mall restaurant has been perpetually packed for dinner since opening day. Here he serves a monthly changing menu of Southern French and Mediterranean cooking spotlight-ing seasonal local produce. Highlights include a clever, ethereal Dungeness crab panna cotta, a lush bourride seafood stew, and an ultra-rich macaroni-and-ham casserole. The adventurous mainly-Cal wine list is remark-ably affordable, with many choices available by half-bottles and glasses (and modest corkage if you BYO). Dinner reservations urged; no groups larger than ten accommodated. Lunch Tuesday through Friday; dinner Tues-day through Sunday. Moderate. — N.W. (12/03)

Tom Giblin's Irish Pub 640 Grand Avenue (at Roosevelt Street), Carlsbad Village, 760-729-7234. Occupying the whole of a handsome, sprawling, block-long Elizabethan-style building, this friendly "small-townish" saloon offers some above-average pub-grub, especially the perfect, moist corned beef with firm-tender cabbage, the huge lively salads, and the house-baked brown bread. Boxty (Irish "peasant" potato pancakes, rarely found in California) are done up rather doughy rather than crisp to serve as "wraps for corned beef and other dishes. Live music on holiday evenings and during happy hours. A large, attractive heated patio next to the parking lot offers some afternoon serenity. Open daily, lunch late, until late, plus Sunda breakfast/brunch. Inexpensive. -Sunday N.W. (3/02)

Trattoria Positano (Cardiff-bythe-Sea) 2171 San Elijo Avenue (at Chesterfield), Cardiff-by-the-Sea, 760-632-0111. If you're tired of Italian restaurants, you'll be revitalized by this one. Original recipes, wonderful fresh fish, nightly specials, excellent lamb and pastas. Very warm atmosphere. A treasure. Reservations accepted only for parties of six or more; expect a wait at prime dinner hours, especially on weekends. Lunch and dinner six days, Sundays dinner only. Upper moderate. — E.W. (6/98)

NORTH INLAND

Abbey's Real Texas BBQ 6904 Miramar Road (at Commerce Street, behind Denny's), Miramar,

858-566-5235. Texas barbecue consists of meat, chicken, turkey, and links that are repeatedly mopped with a mari-nade and cooked in a big cast-iron smoker (rather than grilled over a fire). Here they use mesquite to barbecue the poultry quickly and the brisket ve-r-rry slowly. In addition to the usual BBQ sides (potato salad, coleslaw, beans, etc.), they offer a Caesar salad. At the Miramar branch the room is large and unadorned but very clean. Wheelchair accessible. Same menu lunch and dinner. Open daily; continuous service for lunch and early dinner weekdays: normal dinner hours weekends. Inexpensive to low moderate. - E.W.

Galeon (Escondido) 503 West Mission (at Centre City), Escondido, 760-746-5951. Mexican seafood, along with the usual dishes, is featured in a bright coffee-shop atmosphere with comfortable booths, big windows, a lunch counter and a salad bar. Shrimp and *langostino* ("squat lobster," in fishermen's terms) are the house specialties, and are well treated. Also consider an intense little marlin taco (squeeze some lime onto this rich, strong fish), or the savory *albondigas* soup (lime it up, too). Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive (standard dishes) to moderate (seafood). — *N.W. (6/01)*

Island Boy Grille 10066 Pacific Heights Boulevard (south of Mira Mesa Boulevard, at Carroll Canyon Road), Sorrento Mesa, 858-452-7708. It's the last thing you'd expect up here in Corporate Lunchland, but Pua Macario's Hawaiian food sanctuary is the real thing. Pua ("Flower") serves genuine items like purple *taro poi*, seven-hour cooked *lau-lau* (beef, pork, and fish slow-steamed in taro and banana leaves), rice delivered by the ice-cream scoop, potato salad delivered hot with shrimp and crab in it, and mahi mahi, lots of lovely flame-seared mahi mahi. Delivered in a standard polystyrene box, eat in or out. And heavy! The Wasa Plate will include, say, two big pieces of mahi mahi, a pile of shredded kalua pig and cabbage, or kahuna shrimp, or teriyaki chicken, plus two scoops of rice, salad and any side dish. If you're a really big kahuna, the Kanaka Plate will deliver three main entrées and three scoops of rice. Sparse decoration: eggshell blue walls with photos of real hula-dancing, and a longboard by Hawaiian Julian Cruz (it's yours for \$450). Warning: only

Pho Hoa Hiep 9910 Mira Mesa Boulevard, #A, 858-578-1468 (also at 6947 Linda Vista Road, 858-268-8406). This *pho* (soup) place of the brothers Hoa and Hiep is a clean, busy eatery near hi-tech offices. It's popular at lunch and dinner, partly because of frequent two-for-one deals. Try the #1, Dac Biet Xe Lua, an "extra large bowl" of soup filled with rare steak slices and well-done brisket, flank, tendon, and tripe along with mint and bean sprouts. A popular breakfast pho is "French bread with beef juicy cube soup." They also have rice dishes. And try the traditional fruit drinks, maybe the Xam Bo Luong, a combination of loganberry, black dates, seaweed, and lotus seeds in syrup. Lunch, dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/03)

Rancho Valencia 5921 Valencia Circle, Rancho Santa Fe, 858-759-6216. Nestled in the lush garden setting of the Rancho Valencia Resort is one of San Diego's dining gems. They adver-tise the cuisine as California-French. Whatever. Every bite from appetizer to dessert is prepared and presented to delight Californians, French people - actually, any person on the planet with taste buds. Their crab cake topped with sun-dried apricot-mango chutney was equal to the best you'd eat around Chesapeake Bay. Their Thai chicken mushroom will make you weep with happiness, call it a night, and go home satisfied. But then you'd miss out on enjoying an entrée of prime mesquitegrilled steak, fresh fish, veal, lamb, or chicken. Portions are generous, as is the wine list. Casual-elegant dress. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Very expensive. — S.M. (6/04)

Sand Crab Cafe 2229 Micro Place (at Opper, off Barham), Escondido, 760-480-2722. Sandy Crabbe (honest, that's his name) owns this fun, funky dive in the wilds of industrial Escon dido near the San Marcos border. A visit offers the primordial, preschoolish joy of whacking crabs to pieces with mallets and eating them with your hands. (Bibs are optional.) Everybody gets into the party spirit. There's a huge à la carte list of appetizers, soups, snacks, and main courses, often at bargain prices. Entrées include several crab-bucket combos, cooked to a well-seasoned boil with corn, potatoes, and

Tong's has several variants, mainly cornstarch-battered fried proteins in honey-based sweet-and-sour sauce, lightened with loads of seasonal fruit chunks—pineapple, papaya, pear, etc. They're tasty dishes. For the rest, the Szechuan specialties (hot-and-sour soup, kung pao, ma la, etc.) are better than the old "Chinese-American" standards on the menu. Lunches are big. bargain-priced, and popular. In this quiet, pretty room, you may overhear northern or western Chinese dialects at nearby tables. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Very inexpensive (lunch) to low-moderate. -N.W. (5/01)

Vincent's Sirino's 113 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-745-3835. French-born chef-owner Vincent Grumel serves Gallic classics in an intimate, small-town bistro setting. This is a cuisine of rich dark sauces robing fine ingredients, such as a huge, fla-vorful veal chop (no factory calf, that). Mushrooms and vegetables (from local farmers or Grumel's own garden) are the season's best and sensitively treated. Desserts are worth every calorie - save room for the spectacular Bavarian. Full bar, fine wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Expensive. — N.W. (6/01)

Besta Wan Pizza House 148 Aberdeen Drive (off the 101), Cardiff-bythe-Sea, 760-753-6707. This ever-pop-ular North County restaurant which opened back in 1965 is a family operation all the way. Their thin-crust East

Coast-style pizzas are famous locally. Also check for the big-pile spaghetti or lasagna specials if you just want to fill up. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/01)


Cafe Zinc 132 South Cedros (at Loma Santa Fe), Solana Beach, 858-793-5436. The Rancho Santa Fe set like to hang out here in the garden patio with their Porsches at the curb and their shih tzus under the table (dogs are welcome). Even for non-doggie people, the California pepper trees and garden sculp-ture make this indoor-outdoor eatery a really pleasant kick-back place (which gets its name from the zinc-top bar inside). The menu, a mixture of Italian and vegetarian, offers dishes like frittata with cucumber salsa, and baked eggplant "pizzette" (personal-size pizza) with marinara, mozzarella, and Parmesan cheese. Seating is available at the sushi bar or the central dining area, which provides capacious booths. A tatami room (with floor-seating on tatami mats, Japanese style) offers special prix fixe feasts (\$60 per person and up), by reservation only. Open daily. Moderate to extremely expensive. - E.W.

Tony's Jacal 621 Valley Avenue (between Genevieve Street and Juanita Street), Eden Gardens, Solana Beach, 858-755-2274. Come here at night, when the mysterious low mud-brick arches with the stained glass windows make you think Old Mexico, when the Del Mar racing bar makes you think 1930s Hollywood, and the dining patio, under the 100-year-old chinaberry tree, looks straight out of Guadalajara. Back in 1946, Tony Gonzales's wife Catalina started preparing food for fellow Mexican workers. Since then, everybody from Liz Taylor to J. Edgar Hoover has passed through these portals. Try the "La Colonia" combination of just about anything with rice and beans. Turkey meat is big here, and the (real)

La Taverna 927 Silverado Street (at Girard Avenue), La Jolla, 858-454-0100. Reservations are a ne-Jolla, cessity at this tiny trattoria, especially if you'd prefer the relative quiet of the roofed sidewalk patio to the din of the cute but cramped dining room. Don't look for meatballs and red sauce except at lunch because dinner is Tuscan-style showcasing pastas with simple, fresh sauces. Highlights include chef-owner Mary Ann Vitale's house-made Sicilian-style fennel sausage, and if the feather-light potato gnocchi are a spe-cial, just say yes. Save room for a slice of house-made layer cake. Service is downright endearing on weekends, when Jimmy Vitale (the owner's husband) charmingly plays maitre d' Moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

The Pannikin Cafe 7467 Girard Avenue (at Pearl), La Jolla,

858-454-5453. Oh sure, the inside of this converted bungalow is cool, with its woody-green tables of different heights and cool damsels with animal temp-tattoos on their arms serving you. But here at Pannikin's La Jolla outpost, the outside's the "in" spot, with its brick and earth tones and weathered timber and sixties rainbow tables. But you have to make it through the laptop-clack ing, cell phone-blabbing crowd who use this as their garden office and Very Important Meeting spot. Musicians, grad students, and school kids also show up to munch twigs and nuts and think serious thoughts. Breakfasts are mostly steamed-egg variations, includ-ing the popular Greek eggs and a filling breakfast burrito. For lunch, a mild chicken curry is a nutty treat, and "pan nwiches" such as ham or tuna are fresh, generous, and worthy, though the ret ros among us will be looking for a salt lick all the way home. Roppongi 875 Prospect Street (at Fay), La Jolla, 858-551-5252. In terms of atmosphere and food preparation, one of the best restaurants in La Jolla. The Euro-Asian fusion menu offers a vast choice of 20 appetizers, or *tapas*, including several sushi rolls. Don't overlook the Thai coconut soup, Atlantic salmon, and duck confit at dinner, or the niçoise salad at lunch. Beautiful interior; lovely heated patio; excellent service. Be sure to reserve, especially for dinner, to avoid a very long wait. Open daily. Moderate (tapas) to expensive. - E.W. (12/99) Sadaf 613 Pearl Street (at Cuvier), La Iolla, 858-551-0643, You worry those formal fixtures and black-tux waiters, the gold-encrusted paintings and the crisp, pink table linens all scream "expensive!" Actually, prices are easygoing, especially at lunch. The appetizers are free: a basket of lavash (unleavened bread), and beside it, butter and a large sliced raw onion. Eating bread with onion makes you hungry, say the Persians. Then try skewers of chicken or ground filet mignon with rice or salad, or albalou polo (rice, dried cherries, and chicken). Pistachio-androsewater ice cream is a great finale. Nonspecials and evening meals cost more, but at any price this is real Persian food, with typical riotous herbage and sybaritic spicing. Another branch in the Gaslamp turns into a nightclub after dinner, but the food's better at this La Jolla flagship. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (10/00)

Tutto Mare 4365 Executive Drive (at Executive Way), Golden Triangle,

858-597-1188. The modern Italian cuisine here emphasizes pasta and fresh seafood from the mesquite grill or oak-fired oven. Lunch hours roar with chic crowds from the surrounding office buildings, but the kitchen is most on its toes then, too. Pastas are mainly housemade, with fresh-tasting sauces, and substantial seafood salads are available. Entrées (whether seafood or meat) may be overcooked by the fierce wood fires, and most come with minor variations of the same lemon-butter sauce and a one-size-fits-all veggie medley. Full bar, interesting wine list, good Happy Hour nibbles. Complimentary valet parking. Call for careful directions (very hard to find). Extremely noisy. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner weekends. Pastas and salads moderate, entrées expensive. - N.W. (10/02)

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

24-Hour Valley Kitchen Family Restaurant 875 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-819-1017 or 619-298-8282. Great when everything else is closed. The place feels like a Midwestern chain eatery: all carpets, darkwood walls, etched glass. Prices are a little up there, but hot French dip is great and burgers are generous. Best news may be that if you feel like breakfast at midnight, no problem. Ask for the pork chops, two eggs, hash browns, and biscuits and gravy. Chops are crumbed and buried in hash browns. Splosh on lots of applesauce, and leave room for the biscuits — their bacon-fat gravy will have you licking the plate. Bonus: You can sit here with a book and a coffee all night long if you like. Avenue, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-6771. One of San Diego's hidden jewels: there's classic American fare (honeyglazed pork tenderloin, farmhouse chicken) in the "Officers' mess," but better yet is the free buffet Happy Hour — pig heaven weekdays from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Selections might include a "stroganoff" of Polish sausage, veggies, cheese potatoes, nachos, etc. (Of course, you have to buy something — say, a pitcher of Bud for two.) Thursdays and Fridays, the outside "Runway" grill features kebabs. The biggest attraction is the place its self. Built to mimic a WWI French farmhouse taken over by a bunch of Yankee flying aces, it has a garden full of antique planes and live ducks — and right outside, the real Montgomery airfield. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Andres' Patio Restaurant 1235 Morena Boulevard, Bay Park, 619-275-4114. This is a cozy cultural surprise on hard-to-define Morena Boulevard. The food is flavorful (and not spicy-hot like Mexican and South American dishes). A good introduction to it is ropa vieia ("old clothes"): shredded beef sautéed with mushrooms, green pepper, and tomatoes with everpresent rice and black beans. And the Cuban sandwich (roast pork, baked ham, and cheese) shows off the Cuban handling of pork. Other interesting dishes include alcapuria (pork and green plantain) and luscious, messy yuca con mojo (yuca root with garlic oil). Open for lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday. Emerald Chinese Seafood Restaurant Pacific Gateway Plaza, 3709 Convoy Street (at Aero Drive), 1st floor, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888. Arguably the best Chinese restaurant in the county, here's where local Asians (of all nations) go for both casual family dinners and special feasts of Hong Kong specialties. When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Vietnamese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gourmet delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations ac cepted for all meals, including weekend dim sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in madeto-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate with moderate splurges like live fish and Peking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). Open daily from lunch until midnight or later. $-\dot{N}.W.(9/02)$

Via Italia Pizzeria Trattoria 4705-A Clairemont Drive, Clairemont Square, Clairemont, 858-274-9732; also at 565-569 South Coast Highway 101 (between E and D), Encinitas, 760-479-9757. Don't look for spaghetti and meatballs or Alfredo here — the menu features wonderful, authentic dishes from all over northern Italy (not Naples or Brooklyn). The nightly specials and well-priced Thursday night tasting menus are particularly inspired — they're what Chef Alan Martinelli really feels like cooking. The pizzas (whole pies only) are a must — thincrusts and dressed with perfect proportions of sauce, cheese, and lovely, simple toppings. The long, helpful Italian wine list includes bottles at every price range. The downside? At the original branch (in the "Food Court" near the Clairemont mall's theaters), the room is noisy, service can be abrasive, and reservations, while recommended, are not always honored timely. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (6/02)

THE BEACHES

Brazil by the Bay Restaurant and Sports Bar 3770 Hancock Street, na Portal, 619-692-1410 It's not by the bay, but the food is definitely by-thebook Brazilian. You know because the first things you see are guaraná, the Amazonian energy drink, and açaï, the Amazonian palm berry energy bowl. If you're not strapped for cash, go for the popu-lar *feijoada* stew, black beans cooked slowly with "six types of pork and two kinds of beef," offered Saturday and Sunday. If you don't have the dough, have what most of Brazil eats every day: the "PF," prato feito ("ready plate"). It's beef, chicken, or fish with rice and Brazilian beans. End with the cheapest dessert, the wicked *brigadeiro*. Come early evening or weekends and you might learn the forro ("fo-ha"), a Brazilian dance. Open seven days; closes early Monday and Tuesday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/04)

Fairouz Cafe And Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at low cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *E.W.*

Hanaoka-2 1203 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-274-9755. This is the suave cousin of the Hanaoka family restaurant in National City. The atmosphere is fifties moderne revival, with a Ginza sleekness. It's still reasonably priced if you choose carefully (most sushi is 20 percent off during early-bird hours, 5 p.m. to 7 p.m.). The Philadelphia roll is delicious with its smoked salmon, seaweed, cream cheese, rice, and sesame seeds. But this place is really aimed at yuppies. People order "cabo-wabo" spicy crab with yellow-tail, or tor roll (meat from the belly of a tuna), which the chef sears with the sharp blue flame of a blowtorch. Every guest gets a loud traditional welcome from the chefs. And a farewell. Open evenings only. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (1/04)

Hawaiian Island Barbecue Pacific Plaza, 1768 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Plaza, 1768 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-483-9830. What do folks really eat in Hawaii? What they serve here: plate lunches. Which means two scoops of rice, one scoop of macaroni salad, and then whatever, like garlic shrimp, mahi mahi or fried shrimp, Hawaiian BBQ beef or short ribs, even hamburger steak. But to go all-out Hawaiian, try the chicken *lau lau* (chicken and butterfish wrapped in (chicken and butterfish wrapped au (chicken and butterfish wrapped in taro leaves), slow-cooked *kalua* pig (don't call it pork) with cabbage, or *limu poke* (seaweed and raw tuna). Barbecue? Their BBQ Mix (Hawaiian BBQ beef, chicken, short ribs, with rice or macaroni salad) is a deal. Authentic? Count the Hawaiians around you. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (8/03)

The Mission Cafe and Coffee House 3795 Mission Boulevard (at San Jose Place), Mission Beach, 858-488-9060. Gourmet and Latino breakfasts served in funky surroundings. Outstanding are cinnamon French toast, blackberry-banana pancakes, and roast beef hash with rosemary potatoes and eggs. Chino-Latino lunch items. All dishes plus fabulous bread, scones, muffins, available for take-out. Open daily 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

People's Organic Foods Co-op Deli 4765 Voltaire Street, Ocean Beach, 619-224-1387. This is the land of "organic," "cruelty-free," "environmentally safe," "shade-grown." Vegan Country. People look either disgustingly healthy, disturbingly pasty, or just plain smug. But the food tastes pretty good. And they sell it by the pound so you can mix and match. Course, you have to learn new words, like tempeh (cultured soy which can be made to taste like anything). And dishes have a sensible momsy East Coast feel — garlic eggplant with beet root and onions, tempeh loaf, sweet squash and rice, millet spinach bake, shepherd's pie, "mango madness," tempeh sausage, steamed vegetables, vegan macaroni and cheese. Bottom line: it's guilt-free. Open seven days, breakfast, lunch, dinner (but "serious" breakfasts Saturday and Sunday only). Inexpensive. — *E.B. (9/03)*

Society Billiards Cafe 1051 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-272-POOL (7665). Okay, this is a pool joint, but a classy one with sidewalk seating and a decent kitchen. It has the normal appetizers - buffalo wings, nachos, potato skins — but also dishes like chicken taquitos and veggie dip, and good salads like teriyaki chicken with French bread or pita. The French connection continues: Marc, the chef, is French and throws a mean Greek, Thai, or New York pizza, or 17 other vari-eties. His mesquite chicken wrap goes great with one of the many ales. And the great thing is, you can come late: the kitchen's open till 1:30 p.m. every night. Lunch, dinner. Inexpensive. -E.B. (5/03)

The Surfside 4527 Mission Boule vard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-273-2979. In the evenings, it's a "scene" here — for good reason. You'll find fresh sushi, sashimi, and "California coastal cuisine," i.e., fun and fla-vorful fusion-y tapas, many of them going for half-price during weeknight Happy Hours. You can actually reserve for the sushi bar (it'll put you at the head of the line), where the chefs are unusually friendly. They shine on simple, pure Japanese sushi, although they make the usual "party rolls," too. Most seafood is of fine quality (except the toro, which seems to have problems). For those preferring a tapas-style site down meal, there's a breezy, informal dining room with large windows looking out on the street, plus a small private dining room for parties. Four Japanese beers, 10 sakes available. Reservations urged for large groups. Parking is tight; just one handicapped slot in front lot. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (10/02)

Sushi Ota 4529 Mission Bay Drive (at Bunker Hill Street), Pacific Beach,

858-270-5670. What becomes a legend most? At its best, this renowned sushi bar offers fish of exceptional quality, perfect tart-sweet rice, tight wraps, and disciplined creativity. These joys don't come easily. First, find the place: Driving south from Balboa, look left, and pull into the mini-mall with the large 7-11 sign (opposite Rubio's). Sit at the sushi bar to snoop on your neighbors' choices, watching for off-menu ex-travaganzas, e.g., sea snails cooked over flaming sugar or the irresistible "sushi sundae" (*uni, toro*, mountain potatoes, salmon roe). Don't miss the ama-ebi with crisp shrimp heads atypically flash-baked (not batter-fried). Cooked dishes are dull except for chawan-mushi (custard broth with gingko nuts). Alas, when Ota-*san*'s away, his elves may play - amateurishly. Best bet: Reserve bar seat for an early dinner Wednesdays through Saturdays, when the master is most likely to be present. Disabled access chancy; long, crowded waits unless you've reserved. Moderate. – N.W. (11/00)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Los Reyes 2496 Broadway (at 25th), Encanto, 619-231-0716. If you've ever craved those fabulous Mexican fish soups that can be such energy restorers, these strip-mall Mexican restaurants have a great one. It's *Caldo 7 Mares* (Seven Seas Soup) and it comes as a big bowl of savory red fish soup clunking with giant crab legs, clams, chunks of white fish, shrimp, the pink and purple suckers of octopus, and vegetables. It's also called *Vuelva a la vida*: "Return to life." On a hot day, their Cocktail Campechana (shrimp and octopus in a light, spicy tomato broth) will return you to life, too. Four brothers and one sister from Michoacan run the place. A very Michoacan dish is *carnitas* pork shoulders. Or try their gringo lunch deal of a bacon cheeseburger with fries and a can of soda. The prices make this a tightwad's paradise. Three meals daily, with the Broadway flagship branch open until midnight on weekends; all other branches closing early every evening. (Smaller branches at 47th and Market, 25th and Imperial, and 1270 Picador Boulevard.) Cash only. Inexpensive. - E.B. (5/03)

Phoenicia 3381 Adams Avenue (at 34th Street), Normal Heights, 619-282-4120. To find this tiny restaurant — the longest-running eatery on Adams Avenue — look for a window featuring a cedar tree (the symbol on the Lebanese flag), an American flag, and the word "Phoenicia" written in Arabic and English. The inside is cramped, but they have sidewalk tables, too. Try their baked eggplant stuffed with lamb, pine nuts, onions, and garlic, or the *kafta* kabob, with ground meat, parsley, onions, and pita bread. The real treat is the *kibbeh neyeh*, raw lamb with cracked wheat, onions, and seasonings, but you'll need to call 24 hours ahead to get it. Homemade rose juice and Lebanese coffees are delicious, too. Breakfast through very early dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Saigon 4455 El Cajon Boulevard, City Heights, 619-284-4215 or 619-284-4288. You're in a big glass palace here. It's especially good on Sundays, when three- or four-generation Vietnamese families gather for lunch. Gaggles of waiters hover a glance away, but take your time. The menu has over 250 items on it. Default choice: *pho*, the famous, filling soup-meal of Vietnam where beef cooks in the soup. Another safe bet is stir-fried crispy or soft egg noodle with seafood and assorted vegetables. "33" Vietnamese beer is on hand to make Saigon lovers sentimental. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

Trieu Chau Restaurant 4653 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-280-4204. This is as near as you'll come to eating breakfast in Phnom Penh or lunch in Vientiane. Cambodi-ans come in the morning to talk politics and play Cambodian chess. At lunch, Laotians replace them. Maps of "Kampuchea" decorate the walls, as well as long-distance telephone ads. The menu includes Chinese, Khmer, and Lao dishes. In the morning, ask for "*djak kvai coffay dok ko*" — fried bread with Cambodian coffee, the standard French-Khmer breakfast. Later in the day, you might try pan-fried noodles with broccoli and beef or shrimp and gravy ("koitiow bahat sai kho"). doubt, ask for Kathy, who speaks Chi-nese, Khmer, Lao — and English. Open daily, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

Turf Supper Club 1116 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-234-6363. At this cozy saloon (a landmark since 1950, "re-es-

tablished" in 1998), if your meat's done wrong, it's your own fault. Every night's an indoor cook-out, as patrons huddle by the communal fire-pit tending their steaks (a choice of three ritzy cuts, well-marinated in garlic and olive oil), burgers, chicken breasts, or portobello mushrooms; others choose the veggie kabobs or teriyaki skewers of beef, chicken, or fish. And that's the menu. The only side dish is a simple salad — not even fries. But the meat's a treat, especially the huge, juicy Delmonico rib eye. If you're an utterly hopeless cook, a staffer will mind your meal for you, but you'd miss half the fun. Full bar, no reservations. Open nightly. In expensive to barely moderate. -N.W. (4/01)

Barnes Bar-B-Que 2625 Lemon Grove Avenue, Lemon Grove, 619-462-9206. Clayton Davis's sign says it all: "Let Us Bring Tha South to Ya Mouth." You can tell this is the real deal from the two heavy iron doors in the brick wall behind the counter and the big wood fires burning oak inside. This is Memphis-style soul food, mild and mouth watering — and cheap. Ex-pect dollar portions, from smothered chicken or pork, neck bones and cabbage, to country yams, corn on the cob, and corn bread. Other lip-smacking dishes include chopped beef brisket sandwich, pork ribs or shoulder, beef ribs, red snapper, and hot links or ham - all with two sides and bread Oh yes, they also serve catfish sandwiches and sweet potato tarts. Or you could just stand outside and smell the smoke. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/04)

Jimmy's 6935 Mission Gorge Road (at Town Center Drive), Santee, 619-448-8994. We're at the end of the line here, the trolley's Orange Line. Feels like a safari. You walk back through the grass to the streets of San-tee. Thank goodness for this familyfriendly restaurant with good, old-fash-ioned American food. Their six-page plastic menu tells all — forget your diet and dig into the breakfast "Eggs and Cakes" (two eggs, three pancakes), the "Touchdown" (two eggs, two hotcakes,

Even the plain ol' fish and chips taste fresh, with crispy batter and good malt vinegar. The coleslaw (it's made with raisins) freshens your mouth up for the next round. You get the feeling these guys really care. Plus plenty of the sides you'd expect, like zucchini sticks and hush puppies. Open daily for lunch and dinner; Monday dinner only. Inexpensive. — E.B. Lucky Star Seafood Restaurant 3893 54th Street (at University Avenue, in Kmart Shopping Mall), College Area, 619-229-8228. The Cantone and Mandarin menu runs to 225 dishes, not to mention the dim sum lunches from roving carts bearing goodies. The huge room is perfect for large parties (call ahead to reserve) or banquets. Not to be missed are lobster dishes, steamed whole fish, Dungeness crab in special sauce, and frog's legs. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to upper moderate. -E.W. (9/99)

Ranas.Com 9683 Campo Road, Suite A, Spring Valley, 619-589-1792. With 33 Mexican restaurants in the area, this Mexico City eatery has got to be good. It's a cheery place with lime green walls and orange accents. Cooking from the capital tends to be less bitingly hot than some northern food, with unexpected taste combos, like pollo en salsa de cacahuate (an almost Thai-tasting chicken in peanut sauce which comes with rice, beans, and tortilla). Or try the delicious pelangoches, a mess of bacon, pork pineapple, mushrooms, bell peppers onions, and cheese. Aztec huarache (cactus with potato, cheese, lettuce, sour cream, and salsa) is also easy to love. Open daily; closes early on Sun-day. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/04)

Sunny Garden Cuisine of China 5500 Grossmont Center Drive (next to Target), La Mesa, 619-464-2288. Decent Chinese food, in East County, in a mall? Yes. Fans of fried goodness will of course swoon over tempura shrimp — panko-crusted, huge and tender — but they might also start with the smoked chicken: smoky meat swaddled in an orangey fried coat, served atop a deeply munchable bed of salty-sour fried mustard greens. The menu is typically broad. Chicken, shrimp, beef and pork are all given the mu-shu treatment - mixed with bamboo shoots. bean sprouts, and thin, chewy mushrooms and wrapped tableside (if you like) in papery pancakes. *Yu-hsiang* (with shrimp, beef, or pork) includes vegetables that are flavorful (not afterthoughts) in a refreshingly non-sweet vinegar sauce. Specialties include Peking duck and fried noodle nests filled with either seafood or beef. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. - A.M. (4/02)

Vallev House Restaurant 10767 Woodside Avenue (at Magnolia), San-tee, 619-562-7878. This is for Cornbelt folks, plus wannabes who enjoy plain-speaking, plenty-of-it Iowan food. Take the morning special, "Iowa Breakfast": breaded pork tenderloin, two eggs, and hash browns, fries, or grits, plus a choice of biscuits, muffins, or toast it's delicious. Lunch or dinnertime you can't go wrong ordering the signature "Iowa Porker" hot sandwich (breaded pork tenderloin in a bun with soup, otato salad, or steak fries) or the "Iowa Beefers" (seasoned ground beef simmered in chicken broth, piled into a burger bun). Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

FAR EAST

Dulzura Cafe 16985 Highway 94 at Dulzura, 619-468-9591. Think Grapes of Wrath, Okies, the 1930s. Dulzura Café is the real thing, serving big, hot meals to weary westerners since 1910. The walls are cluttered with license plates, pots, brass cream-separators, corn-shuckers, horse collars, railroad lanterns, ancient egg-beaters, six-foot snake skins, deer antlers, and a seedy stuffed bobcat head. The food's for fille-cut fries, thick slices of meat loaf

or if you arrive early, steak and eggs or a hefty Denver omelet. This is frontier food before slim spelled "success." Breakfast and lunch Monday through Thursday, three meals on weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

La Posta 32337 Old Highway 80, Pine Valley, 619-478-5600. Is the Wild West dead? Not out here. Swagger in past the rocking chairs on the wooden porch, by the "NRA meets here, every 3rd Wednesday, 7 p.m." sign, past bows and arrows, dream catchers, lariats, and brass spittoons, and swing into a chair. Now think vintage American food. Hefty anytime-breakfasts include two eggs, hash browns, biscuits, and coffee or eggs with chicken-fried steak or a bulging veggie omelet. Their sour-dough cheeseburger with fries or potato salad is big, or delve into a bowl of chili. Folks hereabouts talk about that chili in low, reverent voices. For dinner, the rib eye steak or pork chops is good enough to make city folks swoon. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. - E.B. (8/03)

Potrero's Cafe 25125 Highway 94, Potrero, 619-478-2697. Watch for the three great old Live Oak trees. This café sits under them and looks straight out of a 1930s Western movie. Lot of good old boys in ten-gallon hats gather here. The menu's non-PC. It features rib-sticking food from biscuits and gravy to a mountain of hot cakes, or the famous mushroom-and-onions hamburger with baked beans. Open for breakfast and lunch; closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

Adams Avenue Grill 2201 Adams Avenue, University Heights, 619-298-8440. The frequently changing menu tries to embrace several disparate styles, and can't quite get its arms around any of them. The dishes are often ambitious; a few soar, but many falter due to flaws in conception. execution, or both. Largely ho-hum wine list needs selections with enough sweetness to stand up to items featuring Asian spice - where are the Rieslings? Still, the place seems full of hapbustle. Soups receive lavish attention, and sometimes live up to their billing — the blood orange and roasted butternut squash soup is delicious, dark and complex. The generous, marvelous lavender-infused crème brûlée makes this a dessert destination — pause to sniff a spoonful before slipping it between your lips. Inexpensive to moderate. -A.M. (4/01)

Bread and Cie 350 University Avenue (at Fourth), Hillcrest, 619-683-9322. At least twenty breads emerge daily from this bakery's 10,000pound French stone hearth oven. Most are dense, crusty, and delicious French or Italian peasant breads, including the outstanding anise-fig and black olive loaves that are served in many top local restaurants. Scones, brownies, muffins, banana bread, and cookies are the sweet side of the house. Focaccia pizza and sandwiches (many with thick-sliced bread and rather thin fill-ings) are available to take out or eat on the spot — inside the café or on the sidewalk patio. Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. -N.W. (6/02)

Cafe on Park 3831 Park Boulevard (at University), Hillcrest, 619-293-7275. Okay, it's trendy, from the rusty spoon-and-fork sign at the Hillcrest, door to the PC industrial interior (concrete walls, exposed plumbing). But don't expect PC food. The plates are huge and overflowing with fodder. Breakfast scrambles are popular with add-ons such as smoked salmon, artichoke hearts, or brie cheese. Health nuts choose the Park Porridge stuffed with apples, raisins, and honey. But the prize may be the dish that Placerville, California, miners ordered when they came down from the mountains with pockets full of gold: the Hangtown Fry — luscious marinated sautéed oys ters scrambled in eggs. Lunch has deals too: the roasted eggplant is cheap and good. Three meals Tuesday through Saturday; only breakfast and lunch Sunday and Monday (line at door on Sunday). — E.B. (10/01)

Cafe Pacifica 2414 San Diego Avenue (next to Old Town graveyard), Old Town, 619-291-6666. The fare here is

mainly very fresh seafood, either fusioned up and somewhat chancy, or grilled simply and reliably excellent. Among the highlights are a cleanlimned clam chowder, some amusing yellowfin-stuffed wontons, crab-stuffed portobello mushrooms, and luscious mustard-crusted Oregon catfish. On the downside, Mexican pink abalone are tiny, over-breaded, and overpriced. Several good grilled meats are available for fish-scorners. Optional valet parking \$4. Wheelchair lot and ramp behind restaurant (ask valet to direct you). Often very noisy. Serious, rather steep California wine list; full bar. Daily, dinner only. Upper moderate to expensive. — *N.W.* (10/02)

Jack and Giulio's Italian Restau-

rant 2391 San Diego Avenue (at Arista), Old Town, 619-294-2074. After more than four decades in business, this father (Giulio) and son (Jack) operation manages to stay fresh. The an tipasto salad with its thin-cut prosciutto and salami will get your juices flowing, or try the mango salad, with fresh mango, raisins, and sweet onions All the traditional Italian entrées like veal parmigiana and fettuccine Alfredo are there, but go for the house specialties like Spaghetti New Orleans with shrimp, crawfish, and crab meat, or the expensive scampi dishes. Broke? Get a simple Angel Hair Mediterraneo or rigatoni with meat sauce to enjoy out on the patio. Open for lunch and dinner, seven days. Moderate. -E.B. (5/04)

Khyber Pass 523 University Avenue (at Fifth Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-294-7579. The room's very modern, but Afghan cuisine is full of history, carrying echoes of both Persian and Indian foods, with even a hint of Greek (Alexander the Great conquered the region). Dinners feature kebabs, tandooris, curries, and some unique regional specialties. Flavors are exotic but oddly comfortable to the cosmopolitan palate. Among the don't-miss items are the outstanding *aushak* (spring onion ravioli) and *mantu* (groundmeat ravioli) - both with lively vogurt - and zamordd chalow, a spicy lamb-and-spinach stew. Save room for

This rustic-looking restaurant is animated with antic humor (check the multilingual graffiti on the walls) and offers unique, flavor-bomb dishes. Don't miss the world-beating beefy, herb-jungle borscht (beet soup, but it's way more than that), the Lobio bean dip, and Olivier salad. The chef slow-smokes his moist barbecued beef and pork and cold-smokes whole trout, a treat as a group appetizer or summer entrée. On weekends, there's sublimely smoky shashlik (a.k.a. shish kebab). The printed menu is only a hint as to what's really cooking, and regular patrons get the best off-menu choices. So become a regular. Street parking is dire. Reservations advised for weekend dinners. Brunch weekends featuring blini (Russian crêpes). Dinner nightly, service until 11 p.m. on weekends. Moderate. — *N.W. (1/04)*

Co-owner Jeff Rossman, Hillcrest, formerly in charge of the front of the house, has moved into the kitchen to serve as chef at this comfortable neigh borhood spot, serving venturesome, if uneven, tropical-influenced American cooking. You can settle in a spacious southwest-tinged dining room or peo-ple-watch from a sheltered outdoor patio (with smoking permitted). Generously sized tapas can serve as appetizers or as a sustaining bite before ven-turing into Trader Joe's across the street. The dinner menu changes seasonally, featuring barbecue items during the summer, comforting fare in colder weather, and special dinners on all major holidays. Good wine list with several flights available, full bar with tropical cocktails (Pisco Sours, Caipirinhas, et al.). Reservations advised, especially for weekends, holidays and special events (e.g., Sunday "blues and barbecue" during the summer). Open daily for lunch or brunch, snacks, dinner. Moderate. - N.W. And entrées like arni psitoroast leg of lamb - are guaranteed to stuff you. They come with rice, roast potato, a vegetable, soup or salad, and French bread and butter — all at a

darned good price. Oh, and don't de-spise the gyro. Meat flavor's great, and it takes a football player to empty this plate. Lunch Monday through Friday; dinner nightly, to 10 p.m. on Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. - E.B. (2/03)

Cabo Cafe & Grill 808 West Cedar (near Pacific Coast Highway), Little Italy, 619-595-1618. This miracle restaurant is run by homeless kids from the Monarch School Project next door, with a little help (okay, a lot) from Rubio's and its founder Ralph. He helped raise a million dollars to get the school and the restaurant running. Think Star bucks meets Taco Bell (oops, sorry Ralph). The place is like its kid-staff: smart, cheery (they painted all the seals and porpoise murals), with a great fountain-gurgling patio outside. Try the grilled burrito (grilled chicken or steak with guacamole, roasted salsa, sour cream, black beans, Mexican rice, and melted Jack cheese in a warm tortilla) or, as a great filler, the Cabo Maestro Bowl, with marinated grilled chicken or steak in a bowl with black beans, Mexican rice, cheeses, guacamole, and shredded cabbage. And yes, they do make the Rubio fish taco. Daily specials. Open weekdays, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. E.B. -E.B. (5/02)

Candelas 416 Third Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-4455. Don't look for tacos here — Chef Eduardo Baeza specializes in alta cocina, a luxurious, inventive combination of traditional Mexican fare and French techniques In a handsome Spanish-style dining room (romantic but rather noisy) with gracious service, the menu emphasizes seafood, including a signature dish of luscious stuffed Maine lobster. Plenty for meat lovers, too, with fine Black Angus cuts inventively garnished. Diners can choose an adventure-meal or an evening of sophisticated comfort food. Urbane multicultural fusion dishes dance cheek to cheek with remade American classics and the occasional sleek French luxury dish. A new "grazing menu" features small bites for folks on a diet or on the run. The menu changes seasonally, but you can trust the kitchen any time of year. Very noisy. Full bar. The fare features mid-dle-of-the-road faux-fusion salads, seafood, grilled steaks, pastas (most with shellfish), and individual pizzas, plus daily fin-fish dishes listed on a card in a plastic holder on the table. The lighter dishes are the most successful this is not a bad place to "graze" on appetizers and a mini-pizza when you're starved for a view. Difficult wheelchair access to terrace. Don't like beef? You can choose nicely grilled chicken, pork, or salmon, or two vegan pastas (the puttanesca is better than the marinara), or scampi. The appetizer list is mainly trite pub-grub, but the fry-cook does a great job with calamari. And in fair weather, the lush gar-den dining patio is a little piece of Eden.

Blame a potent mixture of sentiment and the lard they refuse to abandon. Folks say that lard flavor is the real Mexico. Also famous: their Saturday menudo. Warning: go easy with their deep wine-colored hot sauce. It's room-rocker strength. The name? From a famous mariachi song, "The Four Cornfields." Open morning to mid-afternoon, Monday to Saturday. Pete's Quality Meats 1742-1/2 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-1684. Pete's Meats was just a butcher's shop until Pete's daughter and sister-in-law got the idea to set up a grill there. Now aficionados line up for Sicilian specialties like Italian-sausage sandwiches, steak sandwiches, and especially spitini - veal rolled around two cheeses onions, tomatoes, pine nuts, currants, parsley, prosciutto, and breadcrumbs. Pete stuffs all of that into a hot bun with marinara sauce, sautéed peppers, and onions as packing. Nuff said? Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Rama 327 Fourth Avenue (near K Street), Gaslamp, 619-501-8424. This large, handsome restaurant is the younger brother of Celadon in Hillcrest. It's named for the king of Thai-land and offers Thai cuisine fit for royalty, made with top ingredients (including Chino Farms produce). The menu includes all the popular favorites but adds authentic dishes rarely found locally, such as chicken and squid with flat noodles and caramelized palm sugar, and a wicked Thai version of Chinese twice-cooked pork, a fat-fest made with unsmoked bacon. Soups and curries are based on freshly made coconut cream of swoony richness. The extensive wine list, unusual in this genre, offers affordable, food-friendly choices plus an interesting reserve list. Full bar, Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner nightly. Moderate. -N.W. Rei Do Gado Churrascuria 939 Fourth Avenue (between E and Broadway), Gaslamp, 619-702-8464. The meats just keep on coming at a Brazilian rodizio: skewer after skewer of churrasco (Brazilian barbecue), a near-endless procession of rotisserie-grilled meats and poultry. At each table there's a wooden cone with one end red and the other end green. Turn the green side up to start the servers parading to your table, offering you tastes cut from long spits of salty, simply seasoned pork, poultry, ribs sausages, and numerous cuts of beef. Turn the cone red side up to take a break from the protein parade. The gargantuan spread includes a buffet in the front of the restaurant with a changeable array of alluring side dishes, salads, fruit, and such intriguing hot entrées as Brazilian oxtail stew or seafood in coconut milk, with exotic but oddly comfortable flavors. There's always a potful of *feijoada*, the national dish — slow-cooked, meaty black beans (in a somewhat bland version, which you can liven up with a splash of hot sauce). 

prepares and hand-rolls her own lumpia, and it shows. It has a nice fresh veggie, marinated-meat taste. But some flavors travel better than others in fastfood translations: The spicy, crisp fried chicken and air-light drop biscuits are fine as can be. The etouffee (whether of chicken or crawfish, when available) is surprisingly decent. The gumbo is weird — flavors aren't bad, but it's more like a Creole risotto, with wet rice instead of liquid (where's the soup?). Dirty rice and jambalaya are nasty and dry. Food quality varies subtly from branch to branch, as does the attitude of the counter-persons. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. N.W. (2/02)

Potter's Field

Even once you have figured out who's who, it's still hard to know which one, or ones, to root for.

he year-end deluge seems to have been holding off in deference to Harry Potter. Deference to, or terror of. A trickle of nonchallengers has barely moistened the soil beneath his feet.

If nothing else, *Syriana* is serioso. Molto serioso. Nominally a "political thriller," it

presents not so much a drama as a diagram, didactic in purpose, of the chain-link interconnections, the slowburn chain reactions, in the Middle Eastern oil trade. It begins, since it must begin somewhere, with the reallocation of oil-drilling rights, in a fictitious desert hot spot, from an also fictitious Texas corporation called Connex to the unfictitious People's Republic of China; and it proceeds - as the dominos start to topple — to the internal power struggle between progressive forces and reactionary forces within that Arab emirate, the proposed merger of the shunned corporation and one of its smaller competitors, the investigation into the propriety of that merger by a mild-mannered D.C. lawyer (Jeffrey Wright) doing the bidding of a Capitol Hill éminence grise (Christopher Plummer), the hiring of an overseas American energy analyst (Matt Damon) as a consultant on the progressive side of the power struggle, the skulduggery of a multilingual CIA

REVIEW DUNCAN SHEPHERD of a multilingual CIA operative (George Clooney) with a license to kill, and the wanderings of laid-off

Islamic oil workers, economic casualties of the reallocation, who ultimately fall in with organized terrorists.

What screenwriter Stephen Gaghan did for the illicit drug business in Traffic, he attempts to do again, as both screenwriter and first-time director, for the even more intricate oil business, adopting some of the same "realistic" conventions (the unsteady camera, the intermittent subtitles, the egalitarian cast of characters, a lack of dramatic emphasis, an absence of heroics), and following the same pattern of crosscutting between plotlines in an apparently deliberate strategy of suspensus interruptus. Limpidity is not his aim. Complexity is, and no matter if the cost is confusion and incomprehension. You really need a scorecard to tell all the




players, and even once you have figured out who's who, it's still hard to know which one, or ones, to root for; which outcome would be for the best; which course of action, if any, would clean up the mess. Damon perhaps emerges as the most sympathetic figure, a development tipped off early on by the death of his child. But you can at least briefly sympathetize also with Clooney — a spy of Graham Greenean scruffiness — when he is having his fingernails pulled out. In the end, Gaghan convinces us he knows a lot more about how the world works than about how fiction works. *The Dying Gaul* permits another

screenwriter, Craig Lucas of Longtime

Companion and *Prelude to a Kiss*, to turn director as well, bringing to the screen his own stage play, a behindthe-scenes peek into the studios and boudoirs of Hollywood: the negotiations over a labor-of-love screenplay about the death from AIDS of the writer's lover (his dream director: "Gus Van Sant, I guess, since Truffaut

is dead"), the producer's insistence that the central relationship of the script be heterosexualized ("Most Americans hate gay people"), the 1,172 reluctant replacements of "Maurice" by "Maggie' at a single keystroke on the computer, the ensuing affair between the writer and the bisexual married producer, and the dire consequences thereof. (None more dire than the ill-advised tableau vivant of the titular piece of sculpture at the fadeout.) The wife's discovery of the affair and her initial retaliation for it are rather patly facilitated in an Internet chat room by the name of Men on a Park Bench (or Menonaparkbench), where she manages to convince the still grieving writer that she is his departed lover communicating from the Other Side. More Prelude to a Kiss, you might say, than Longtime Companion. Altogether too much of an already stagy, static movie takes place in front of computer screens, or, as a stylized but uncinematic substitute, in front of talking heads reciting online chat. The plotting admittedly achieves a certain level of ingenuity if not a commensurate level of credibility, and it steers a course in a no-man's-land between the "serious" indie relationship film and the "generic" mainstream thriller. The cast of Peter Sarsgaard,

Campbell Scott, and Patricia Clarkson sees to it that the course doesn't drift toward the mainstream.

Loggerheads, at the Ken for the next week, spins out three listless storylines, intercut for a semblance of kineticism, and cleverly set at one-year intervals, 1999 through 2001, in separate corners of North Carolina. (Writer-director Tim Kirkman is a native North Carolinian.) Kip Pardue, an HIV-positive pretty boy, devotes his remaining days to saving the turtles at Kure Beach. Tess Harper, the provincial pastor's wife in a place ironically called Eden, frets about the suspected homosexual neighbors who've moved in across the street and about a diminutive nude David on a lawn nearby. And a careworn, and quite touching, Bonnie Hunt hunts for the son she long ago gave up for adoption in Asheville. In time it becomes plain that the storylines are connected and that the larger story the combined story - is of broken connections. The indie limitations of the production do not squelch the sincerity. Protocols of Zion, a higgledy-pig-

gledy video documentary wrapping up its week at the Ken tonight, goes on the trail of neo-anti-Semitism in the post-9/11 world, in specific the prevalence of a rumor that no Jews died in the Twin Towers, and the persistence of a literary hoax of the late 19th Century, authored anonymously in Russia, that purports to lay out the Jewish plans for world domination, straight from the horses' mouths: the notes of a secret

meeting of the Elders of Zion. Filmmaker Marc Levin inserts himself in front of the camera (sometimes with his father, Al) as interviewer and instigator, on a fact-finding mission or fiction-finding, more often ---- that takes him to street-corner crazies in New York City, an Arab-American newspaper publisher in Jersey, a mailorder White Supremacist, the creator of the Jew Watch website, Trenton State Prison, and eventually Los Angeles for the premiere of Mel Gibson's The Passion of the Christ (where "the hottest Jew in Hollywood," Larry David, eludes him at the other end of the phone line). Among the messy mass of information turned up, the most eye-opening bits are probably the clips from a Nazi propaganda film and a couple of Arab TV miniseries, wherein the tables are turned, the shoes are on other feet, and Iews are enlisted to fill the roles of the fiendish villains as conventionally as, in more familiar contexts, Nazis, Commies, or radical Muslims. The cumulative effect of the thing, little offset by a final arm-flapping attempt at uplift, is pretty disheartening.

Aeon Flux, adapted from an MTV cartoon I'd never heard of, remains so cartoonish - what with its computergenerated futuristic utopia, computeranimated internal organs, computermanipulated stunts and body doubles, computer this and computer that it's a wonder it bothered with live actors at all. Charlize Theron, who may have been worried after Monster and North Country that you were beginning to view her as a frump, demonstrates that she can be as sleekly dehumanized as Kate Beckinsale in Underworld or Halle Berry in Catwoman. ("I want to know what it feels like to be a person,' she says at one point, a tad disingenuously.) Frances McDormand, who played opposite Theron in North Country, cannot be dehumanized to quite that extent, but she can at any rate be given a monstrous Pre-Raphaelite hairdo. Director Karyn Kusama, once

Bee Season — Co-directors Scott McGehee and David Siegel, fresh from The Deep End, turn to a novel by Myla Goldberg. And on the evidence it's difficult to see how anyone could have thought there was a movie in it, even someone in the full flush of the spelling-bee documentary, Spellbound. Fictional spelling bees, about which we must speak intuitively rather than empirically, are bound to be low on suspense, and the ones here are so telegraphed that you always know what's going to happen before it happens. The principal speller is an Oakland sixth-grader (Flora Cross) whose eyes-closed technique permits her to "see" the word, often with the help of computer animation, the letters swirling around her head like a flock of tiny seagulls. Her father, a Judaic scholar, amounts to the type of fantasy figure for whom the female addicts of Lifetime movies would be willing to kill. He's Richard Gere, to begin with (designer eyeglasses, ermine coiffure); and he does all the cooking around the house; he plays the violin to his son's cello in afterdinner duets; and when the neglected daughter shows an unexpected aptitude for spelling, he volunteers to be her full-time coach ("I'm pretty good at this sort of thing, you know"), filling her head with occult lore about letters being a conduit to the ear of God. Despite all this, and to the hairpulling exasperation of the Lifetime addict, no one in the family is happy with him, especially his wife, the exhaustingly tense Juliette Binoche, who lost her parents in a childhood car wreck, and who now goes off on mysterious errands, staying out till all hours of the night, breaking into anonymous houses for unknown reasons, having flashbacks to the fatal crash, and eventually serving to illustrate her husband's classroom lessons on "tikkun olam," the repair of the shattered. The newly neglected son (Max Minghella), in what could have been a rich source of humor, finds an alternative path to God's ear, that of the Hare Krishnas, lured there by a Veggie Barbie played by Kate Bosworth. (Neither the son nor the daughter appears to have a friend in the world.) The entire thing attains a degree of pretension that might have been amusing if it weren't so boring. 2005. Capote — Truman Capote, that is, during the six years it took to research and write his "nonfiction novel," In Cold Blood. Regardless of how true a story, it is truly a good story, whose claim on our attention is not that it's factual but that it's fascinating. It is the story, at bottom, of an artist at work; a writer in pursuit of a subject; an established novelist, a Manhattan dandy transplanted from the Deep South, who, for reasons unclear, clips out an item from The New York Times of November 15, 1959,

about the massacre of a family in rural Kansas, and who promptly gets the go ahead from the editor at The New Yorker to hop a train to the scene of the crime. The story, then, of an exotic fruit in the Midwest breadbasket, with his nasally lisping castrato drawl and his ankle-length camel's-hair coat and flowing boa-like scarf. ("Bergdorf's," he volunteers, fingering the scarf under the inquisitive gaze of an agent from the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, who, tugging on his hat brim when taking his leave, says in turn, "Sears, Roebuck.") The story of a man who, in the end, fits his chosen title as well as either the murderers or their executioners. It is not a story with a moral to it, although some viewers will feel compelled, for their own comfort, to draw one; it is simply, and complicatedly, the story of an artist at work. In its general outline — what price art? - it may be a bit old-hat; in its particulars it is like-new. Philip Seymour Hoffman, even after you have gotten over the initial funniness of his celebrity impersonation, serves as our constant reminder to take the story with a grain of salt, to put quotation marks around the name of Capote. His whole-souled commitment to the part, his concentration, his emotion, his expressiveness, his nuance, his multiplicity - all of that helps to make a good story better. Whether or not truer. 

The Constant Gardener — An adaptation of a John le Carré suspense novel, and a long stride for filmmaker Fernando Meirelles (City of God) from the slums of Rio de Janeiro. Le Carré, to be sure, has always had an elevated social consciousness, and a missionary zeal to match, and so the stretch for the Brazilian is largely geographical: to Kenya, where a multinational pharmaceutical company is using the natives as unwitting guinea pigs, or sacrificial lambs, for an experimental drug called Dypraxa. The spectator will require only the slightest touch of paranoia, or slightest taste for the paranoia genre, to find this premise credi-ble. He will face a stiffer challenge to find it cinematic. Vague on particulars, slow in progress, thick in texture, the film follows a course of knowingness rather than "showingness." And the jiggle and jump in the visual style, though tempered a bit from City





of God, can drum up little excitement on their own. Of course, many a filmmaker before Meirelles, like many a casual reader, has failed to locate the thrills in a le Carré thriller. Yet this one holds plenty of appeal as a love story, one which we know from the outset is to be an unhappy one. The murder of a British diplomat's wife in the African backcountry opens the door on a flashback to their first beginnings: he (Ralph Fiennes, almost cringingly diffident) dutifully reading a dull lecture on behalf of a government official in absentia, and she (Rachel Weisz, free and easy) reading him the riot act afterwards on the U.K.'s role in Iraq: "Vietnam the sequel." Not a meetcute, but a meet-rude. And before they have time really to get to know one another, they're in bed, they're married, and, with a baby on the way, they're in Kenya, where the differences in their personalities are brought out in sharpest contrast: the professional fence-straddler and the inveterate firebrand. His private inquiry into her murder, apart from the light shed on corporate malfeasance, answers all questions about the genuineness of her love for him, and of his for her. As we've seen in such other le Carré vehicles as The Spy Who Came in from the Cold, The Looking-Glass War, The Russia House, and (the most cine-matic of these) The Little Drummer Girl, a gooey sentimentalist lurks within the sourball. 

Clooney can surely rival any of his targeted enemies, past or present, in piety; and even, albeit in a somewhat different sense, in reactionaryism: taking up the social-conscious subject matter of the Lumet-Ritt-Frankenheimer generation (he had already done so in his live-television experiment of Fail-Safe a few years back), setting it in the precise period of their salad days, shooting it in blackand-white (not just matching the custom of the time, but Expressionistically matching the Weltanschauung of white hats versus black hats), scoring it with outmoded moody jazz, and treating it in the hectoring, lecturing style of the Rose-Serling-Schulberg screenwriters. In truth the message is gotten across with an altogether unacceptable amount of speechifying; and for all the feverishly overlapping dialogue and the occasional hustle-bustle of cast or camera, it is steadfastly a static film, nailed to a platform. Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire — The fourth installment in

J.K. Rowling's series of children's books yields a two-and-a-half-hour movie which, for all its furious activity, gets virtually nowhere. It gets, more specifically, through the "legendary" Triwizard Tournament, only to arrive at the dampening admonition, "Dark and difficult times lie ahead." Potterites, under the freedom-of-religion pact, ought not to be begrudged their mythology; and two and a half hours of lavish illustration might well strike their eyes as a feast. The skeptic or the mere apathetic is more apt to notice the presumptuousness of filmmakers who expect their audience to meet them seven-eighths of the way. (Have you done your homework, kiddies?) The skeptic or apathetic will also be quicker to sense that the unabated spectacle of special effects becomes almost routine, almost humdrum, regardless of how imaginative some of those effects may be: the sailing ship that surfaces and submerges like a submarine, the ghostly face of Sirius molded in the glowing embers of the hearth for a fireside chat. Such a viewer will also be more prone to argue that this sort of anythinggoes fantasy, with few established rules, fosters a feeling of passiveness if not instinctive, involuntary withdrawal. The new director, Mike Newell, is the best of the three to take the controls in the series to date (Chris Columbus for parts one and two, Alfonso Cuarón for part three), although a runaway train is open only to the most limited guidance. We are reminded of

A History of Violence — Further unpleasantness from the always unpleasant David Cronenberg. Despite the pretentious-sounding title, this is in no sense an historical record of violence as a human fundamental (dating back, say, to Cain and Abel, or farther back to the appearance of the monolith among the apes in 2001), but merely a history in the archaic sense of a story, as in H.G. Wells's The History of Mr. Polly, and also in the sense of a past: a violent story, that is, about a man with a history of violence. More exactly, the bloody chain of events unleashed when the familyman proprietor (Viggo Mortensen) of the Main Street diner in Small Town, U.S.A., is forced to fight back against two homicidal psychopaths at his lunch counter. The unpleasantness on this occasion consists, not atypically for Cronenberg, in some gratuitous gore - stomach-turning makeup effects for a bullet through the top of the head, a nose pounded up into a skull, etc. — as well as in the oppressive mood of ominousness and dread. The latter is quite admirably achieved, especially in view of the conventionality of the plot: the past catching up with a retired killer, a staple of the American action film, whether Western or contemporary crime thriller. Through



such devious means as the sedate and didactic tone, the clear-eyed and controlled cinematography, the deliberate pace, and a spot of uncommonly graphic sex between happily marrieds, the film *feels* unconventional, *feels* unpredictable. And it makes good use of William Hurt's widely recognized looniness for an unexpectedly funny climax, notwithstanding the expected gore. (Beyond unexpectedly funny.) The ultimate purpose of the thing — the unique distinction of the thing — comes down to precisely those sources of unpleasantness and nothing more: the gratuitous gore and the feeling of unconventionality. But the unconventionality, such as it is, proves to be just a feeling rather than a fact: it tends to evaporate rapidly at the curtain. (One recommended point of reference would be Richard Fleischer's perfectly conventional yet subtly subversive *Violent Saturday*, 1955, where the celebration of the smalltown family man who foils the big-city bad guys, with an assist from the pitchfork of an Amish pacifist, is as ambiguous as you please.) And the gore is simply too splashy for its own good. 
Kiss Kiss Bang Bang — Self-reflexive, self-indulgent, self-congratulatory, and selfmocking pastiche of the private-eye genre, the directorial debut of screenwriter Shane Black (Lethal Weapon, The Last Boy Scout, Last Action Hero, The Long Kiss Goodnight, in chronological rather than alphabetical order). The hard-boiled first-person narrator, the chronically insouciant Robert Downey, Jr. ("I was tired, I was pissed, I was wetter than Drew Barrymore at a grunge club"), refers to himself as "your narrator," and knows full well he's in a movie. The title is lifted from a collection of Pauline Kael's film criticism, a title lifted in turn from an Italian movie poster. Pride and Prejudice — By this time the Jane Austen novel qualifies as a repertory piece, a mettle-test for would-be Darcys and Elizabeth Bennets, little different from Romeo and Juliet. The team behind the present production of it, apart from their attempt to replace the titular conjunction with a dashing ampersand, earn no points for imagination or courage in finding their way to so trafficky a corner of the library. (Can no one, for a change, find his way to the shelf of Thomas Love Peacock? George Meredith?) And the prospect of again sitting through the machinations of the author's mating game (match four from Column A to four from Column B) sounds quite tedious in advance. Nevertheless, the filmmakers have not failed to make it involving. Austen herself made it hard for them to fail, as long as they stuck close to the text. Joe Wright, a British TV director in his feature debut, certainly did more than his share to gum up the works, with an anemic, coarse-grained image and a lot of mushy telephoto camerawork: a pale substitute for the MGM sheen of 1940. And Matthew MacFadyen makes a dull Darcy, a blank, more stuporous than brooding, a kind of waxwork Stan Laurel. Any doubts, however, as to the star potential of Keira Knightley — and after the likes of Domino and The Jacket and King Arthur, how could there not have been doubts? - are decisively routed. She may be too pretty for Elizabeth, she may be too young, but she is just sufficiently feisty, just sufficiently fiery, without being too and too. It's a tightrope she walks, and she keeps perfect balance. Two old pros, Brenda Blethyn and Judi Dench, bring solid support as two very dissimilar women, the high-strung Mrs. Bennet and the haughty Lady de Bourgh. Any well-bred young woman who can endure the one on a daily basis and stand up to the other in a moment of crisis must be made of stern stuff. Prime — An older-woman-younger-man affair, stickier than normal because the older woman's therapist happens also to be the younger man's mother. The therapist/mother, a bespectacled, beanbaggy Meryl Streep, is the only one of the three who sees the whole picture, who know that her twenty-three-year-old son, Bryan Greenberg, has become romantically involved with her divorced thirty-seven-year old client, Uma Thurman. (Quite a longshot coincidence even in a town the size of Albany, never mind New York City. Still a longer shot: they meet in the queue of an Antonioni bill.) The therapist herself has been a step slow to catch on, since her client at first fudges the age of the younger man as twenty-seven, while her son fudges the age of the older woman as also twentyseven. The truth, once it dawns, puts the therapist in a ticklish position, wanting to maintain a supportive professional relationship with her client, while not wanting her son to throw himself away on a clockticking shiksa. Somehow the tickles never reach the spectator. Streep, working with a muted New York accent, has plenty of good ideas about the demeanor, the posture, the wardrobe of an East Side psychologist, and she has a wealth of facial expression with which to compensate for the self-conscious cuteness, the unnaturalness, the flatness of the dialogue (written by Ben Younger, who also directed). Even were the dialogue snappier, the busyness, the fussiness, of Streep's performance would be sure to play hell with any rhythm. Whenever she's off screen, however, and hers is the smallest of the three leading roles, you yearn for some-

Sofia Coppola's Lost in Translation is more playful and less somber than her earlier The Virain Suicides, With Bill Murray's low-key demeanor as a middle-aged man who befriends a woman half his age while on a business trip to Japan, the film is perhaps Murray's strongest role during his current career revival.

But the characters of the children are unqualified successes, especially the older one, whose age, by no mere coincidence, closely matches that of writerdirector Noah Baumbach at that same period. The hunched shoulders, the sniffy nose, the sleepy eyes, the shrugging speech of Jesse Eisenberg capture perfectly the role-playing pretentiousness of the young, and the damning details of intellectual laziness all throughout the script complete the portrait. The younger brother, played under a cloud of moroseness (with passing squalls) by Owen Kline, registers as a total original, a self-proclaimed philistine, after careful consideration of Dad's disdainful definition ("Someone who doesn't care about books or interesting films"), and no less pretentious, in his inverted snobbery, than his faux-cultured older brother. This painfully funny film, put simply, is a comedv of character, a human comedy. And while the filmmaking itself is nothing special, the not too jiggly hand-held camera does achieve, in its positioning and its movement, a sort of natural rapport with the humans, an easy congeniality, a Frenchified nonchalance. lustrates the phenomenon). But his overriding concern is frankly himself. It's significant that the movie opens with our mopey protagonist gazing at himself in the mirror, and significant, too, that it tells so much of its story in the form of his first-person narration. One stream-of-consciousness passage, not really narration but interior monologue, almost makes the whole thing worthwhile: a flashback to the time he was sent to the deli to pick up some tartar sauce with a to-go order. He starts out with a clear focus on his assignment ("Tartar sauce, tartar sauce, tartar sauce, tartar sauce"), but the sight of a shapely bot tom in a pair of blue jeans at the crosswalk sets him off on a free-associative riff that takes his mind a long way from a condiment. Nicolas Cage, distancing himself from his action-hero persona, plays the part as a classic sadsack with glimmers of existentialist awareness, and he never remotely looks like someone who would have caught the eye of the network for a million-dollar job on Bryant Gumbel's morning show. His director, Gore Verbinski, ensures he won't look like that with an overcast image that appears to encase him in tinted or frosted glass. Dear Sad Dad,

I strongly suggest you consult a psychologist who specializes in child and family counseling. I think that you, your ex, and your daughter need expert assistance in sorting out what's going on here. Maybe a compromise can be reached where the three of you can do more things as a trio (if the adults can bear it). I'm uncomfortable with the eight-year-old being

responsible for the revision of a custody agreement. Hope sounds like she's struggling and might be in trouble. She may be suffering from serious depression or something else. Ruby seems to feel it's her job now to take care of her mother and provide her stability and company during a rocky period. That's a big burden for a kid. Precisely because Hope is having such a rough time, making her the sole full-time parent might not be the wisest fix. You want to help your daughter feel less anxious and less like her mother's keeper. What's in Ruby's best interest may not be the same as what she asks for.

Dear Saffron,

After many wonderful years, my faithful dog has died of old age. I wanted to bury him in my back yard, but when I mentioned this at the vet's when he passed away they told me that it would be illegal to bury him myself. They said I had to turn the pet's body over to them. I did, but with reluctance. Is it really against the law to inter a pet on your own private property? Or was this vet just giving me a line because there's a big money-making enterprise connected with pet cemeteries? TEARFUL EL CAJON DOG OWNER

Dear Tearful,

I am told, as you were, that health regulations do not permit burying dogs in the yards of resi-

dences. Your only legal choice is to surrender the body to a pet cemetery or crematory, directly or through your vet. If you have your pet cremated you can arrange to have his ashes returned to you. If you have him buried at a pet cemetery you have options that will allow you to mark and visit his grave. My condolences on the loss of your four-legged friend. If you want another dog someday, I hope you will consider adopting one from an animal shelter or rescue organization. There are thousands of great dogs waiting who are homeless and in need of loving human care.

"Cow-tipping" (the legendary prank of sneaking up on a dozing cow and pushing her over) was exposed as a near-impossibility by researchers at the University of British Columbia, according to a November report in The Times of London. Calculating the newtons of force required to topple an average cow (estimating the angles between left hooves, right hooves and the point of push; and the resistance of the cow to downward pressure). Dr. Margo Lillie found that two people could exert the required force only if the cow made no reaction at all to the initial touch, but that more than likely, a successful tipping would require at least five people.

Cultural Diversity

 Prozac Nations: An official adviser to the Blair government warned in September that Britain urgently needed 250 special treatment centers, staffed by 10,000 therapists, to deal with what he called the country's "biggest social problem": a national epidemic of "unhappiness." And in October, German companies donated the equivalent of about \$35 million for a media campaign to make their countrymen feel better about themselves. (Sample script: "Outdo yourself. Beat your wings and uproot trees. You are the wings. You are the tree. You are Germany.")

- Prominent Spanish entertainer Juan Manuel Fernandez Montoya ("Farruquito"), 23, was married in Seville in September to a teenage bride in a televised ceremony that included, for the cameras, the so-called Gypsy custom of the "test of the handkerchief," in which the bride's friends use the garment to ascertain whether the "three drops of blood" (said to be present in a virgin) will appear. (Mrs. Fernandez Montova evidently passed, but women's organizations in Spain were outraged.)

- Japan's Pro Baseball Owners' Association decided in August that, beginning next season, leaders of cheering sections at its games will be required to submit to background checks and be licensed. Permits will be required for anyone who plays drums or trumpets at the game, waves flags or banners, or leads organized chants. Owners say organized-crime gangs were moving into the cheering sections and shaking down fans for tips. - Strange Customs: (1) New Zealand's road safety manager acknowledged in October that the recently enacted Community Roadwatch program does indeed permit police to issue a traffic ticket solely on the say-so of another driver (if there is evidence that the reported vehicle was at the scene and provided the complainer is willing to go to court). (2) Reuters reported on the annual November ritual in Finland in which the incometax agency makes public everyone's tax records for the previous year. (Personal disclosures of income are considered vulgar in Finland, but apparently the November ritual is welcomed.)

Latest Religious Messages

- Adam Turgeon, 27, and Lisa Wagner, 26, were arrested in October for vandalizing the Annunciation of the Lord Catholic Church in Decatur, Ala., which they both said they were moved to do by Jesus Christ himself. Turgeon explained that the couple, independently, had experienced visions of Jesus, and when they found themselves in services on Oct. 2, they reenacted the part of their dreams in which they wrecked the church's altar as a protest against "manmade religion" and idolatry. Turgeon said he was especially bothered by people who balance their checkbooks during church services and by religions that believe only parts of the Bible.

Least Effective Protest

- On Nov. 2, about 45 demonstrators lined up outside the Alliant Techsystems headquarters in Edina, Minn., to protest, for the 512th consecutive Wednesday, the company's work making military weapons that "indiscriminately" kill civilians. However, Alliant says it long ago stopped making those munitions (e.g., land mines, cluster bombs), although it still makes bullets. In fact, much of Alliant's work these days is on "alternative" military weapons that limit civilian casualties. According to a report in Minneapolis's Star Tribune, the demonstrations have taken on a life of their own as a regular

gathering for the area's peace protesters, thus amusing and bemusing many Alliant employees.

People Different From Us

 (1) The Royal Meteorological Society, seeking evidence of global warming for a journal article, happened upon data collected by a fellow named David Grisenthwaite, 77, of Kirkcaldy, Scotland, who has logged detailed information about every single time he mowed his lawn since 1984; he has inadvertently documented that grass-growing season is longer lately. (Grisenthwaite said he also memorizes transit bus timetables.) (2) In England's Lincoln Crown Court, in October, municipal parking employee Julie Wall, 46, was sentenced to three years in prison for embezzling the equivalent of about \$1 million over ten years (spending nearly the entire amount on Elvis Presley records and memorabilia, most of which were found unopened at her home). Said her lawyer, "She simply wanted to own [the items]."

Least Competent Criminals

• (1) Barbara King, 35, was arrested in Largo, Fla., in October on a warrant for forgery and prescription fraud. When police knocked on her door, a man told them that she wasn't home, but a four-year-old girl standing alongside said, "Mommy's in the closet!" (2) Police in Memphis, Tenn., reported in October that they had closed down a crack house on Rosamond Street, a task made easier because the resident usually announced the start of business hours by hanging out a sign reading, "Crack House." (3) Christina Goodenow, 38, of Medford, Ore., was arrested in October for using a stolen credit card, but a conviction would be especially disastrous for her since she just won \$1 million in the lottery with a \$1 ticket she bought with the credit card (thus voiding the ticket).

Readers' Choice

In November, a jury in Westmoreland County, Pa., awarded Ken Slaby \$46,200 for genital injuries inflicted by his vengeful ex-girlfriend, Gail O'Toole, in 2000. While Slaby was napping (according to

QualtechAutoCenter.com

a report in the Pittsburgh Tribune-Review), O'Toole had glued Slaby's buttocks cheeks together, his penis to his abdomen, and his scrotum to his leg, all as payback for his having moved on with his life after their breakup. O'Toole said it was all part of consensual sex between them, but she had earlier pleaded guilty to simple assault for the incident.

Ironies

 In October, martial arts instructor Andrew Jacobs was arrested for allegedly assaulting two ten-year-old girls in their bedroom in Vienna, Va. (but being fended off by them based on skills they learned as students at Mountain Kim Martial Arts Center, where Jacobs was their teacher). Jacobs told police his plan was to tie the girls up so he could steal things from the home.

- In a September road-rage incident in Salt Lake City, a woman sped by in a blocked-off lane to get around a 25-year-old motorist on Interstate 15, then rolled down her window and screamed at him. The man, according to a report in the Deseret Morning News, made an "obscene hand gesture." The woman then pulled out a .357-caliber revolver, shot off the tip of his middle finger, and sped away, outdistancing the man but later crashing into a barricade.

Smooth Reactions

- (1) Car salesman Philip Vandergraff, 35, was arrested in September on a battery charge after an incident at a Ford dealership in Atascadero, Calif. According to customer Jeff Walston, the two were haggling over a car purchase, and when Walston offered \$5000 less than Vandergraff's price, Vandergraff punched him in the face. (2) According to police in New York City, after Joe Daniels complained to neighbor Paul Kim in September that Kim's dogs had bitten Daniels's cat, Kim allegedly attacked Daniels and in the course of the fight, bit him.

The Mazda6 Twins



(PARENTAL WARNING: If reading this column on Santa to a minor, please be advised of content around the seventh paragraph.)
