

Missing links First the good news: KPBS, the local public broadcasting organization owned and operated by San Diego State University, is



reporting total revenues of \$25,131,533 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2005. Now the bad:

despite all that money, the TV and radio stations posted an operating loss of \$1,155,993, compared to a net of \$2,975,981 the previous year, when revenues were \$31,507,088. What went wrong? Well, for one, the report says, "Contributions decreased by approximately \$4.8 million, or 22%, from 2004 to 2005 due to the absence of the two bequests from 2004." Though SDSU is notoriously secretive about the source of donations to KPBS, one of those onetime bequests was likely \$5 million received in 2004 from the estate of the late McDonald's heiress Joan Kroc. Overall, contributions to the stations declined from \$20.821.887 to \$13,704,588. Some of the rest of the falloff was attributed to a reduction in "direct" and "indirect" support payments from the university itself (in other words, state taxpayers), from a total of about \$7.2 million in 2004 down to \$6.8 million in 2005. Other sources of revenue - including cash from station "memberships" and proceeds from a car-donation program - were apparently flat or down, though the stations did not furnish enough details for readers of the report to know for sure.

On the expense side of the ledger, "Underwriting costs" climbed from \$1.7 million in 2004 to \$2 million in 2005. Funds to produce the actual programs offered to viewers and listeners did not fare as well. Slightly more than \$1.5 million in cuts were made in "Programming and production" expenses, which fell from \$11,954,323 to \$10,407,033. "Management and general" expenses dropped from \$3,140,975 to \$2,282,771. But that was still not enough to prevent the stations' posting the big loss. One other thing: members of the public who want to check out the financial report for themselves are told that it is available for review on the KPBS website. But there is a problem: as of Tuesday of this week, the PDF file containing the report was missing pages 11 through 14, where the crucial figures on revenues and expenses are to be found.

Monied pols If nothing else, the prosperous top staffers of San Diego Republican mayor Jerry

Sanders own a diverse array of assets. An example is the mayor's "director of policy," Julie Dubick, a La Jolla lawyer who once ran for school board under the banner of the chamber of commerce. According to Dubick's recently filed statement of economic interests, she owns stock



\$100,000 in an outfit called Limo Leasing, LLP, which perhaps not surprisingly is involved in "limo leasing." She reported getting less than \$500 last year from that venture. Dubick also owns part of a corporation called O'Fallon Co., which she valued at between \$100,000 and \$1 million. It in turn, the form says, owns trust deeds on property at 4749 Market and at 1603 Buckeye Drive in El Cajon. Her husband, who the form says works at the law firm of Dysart & Dubick, makes over \$100,000. Dubick's biggest stock holding, in Qualcomm, is valued at between \$100,000 and \$1 million; she has lesser interests in Bank of America, Hilton Hotels, and Oracle.

Not all members of the mayor's bucks-up city hall crew are pro-GOP. Wealthy La Jolla lawyer and investor James T. Waring, appointed by Sanders last week to the newly created position of "deputy chief operating officer for land use and economic development," is a big donor to Democratic causes. His campaign contributions include \$1000 to John Kerry for President in March 2004; his wife Kathy donated the same amount to the liberal senator from Massachusetts. In September 2004, Waring gave \$2500 to the Environment2004, Inc. PAC, a political action committee based in Washington, D.C., that raised more than \$2 million in an attempt to defeat President George W. Bush in that November's election. The group's campaign included buying \$40,000 of billboards in Florida that said, "Global warming equals worse hurricanes. George Bush just doesn't get it," with a picture of a storm swirling over the state. Waring has long been a member of the board of River Network and recently was elected a board member of International Rivers Network. Both work against construction of dams and other environmental disruptions. When Bush named Deputy Defense Secretary Paul Wolfowitz last March to become head of the World Bank, International Rivers Network's policy director Peter Bosshard said, "It is disgraceful that governments have chosen to fill this important post via backdoor horse-trading rather than through an open selection process."

Up and out It's been a big year for PR maven Kevin Faulconer, newly elected San Diego sec-



and now his boss at his old job at downtown's Porter Novelli is moving on too. Jim Bartell, a former Santee city councilman who once worked for ex-congressman Jim Bates, is leaving his position as San Diego chief of the worldwide PR operation to open his own agency.

Regarded as one of the city's top practitioners in the art of the schmooze, Bartell was told by San Diego city attorney Mike Aguirre to think about registering as a lobbyist after the Union-Tribune reported in October that - based on official calendars examined by the paper — he had the third-highest number of private meetings with councilmembers. His subsequent disclosure showed two clients with business at the city: Equity Office Properties Trust and the San Diego State University Foundation. — Matt Potter

Although Irwin controls only 3 percent of Qualcomm stock, he was still able to name his son as his successor. Standard & Poor's says that

as an investment, Qualcomm rates better than 96 percent of the stocks the rating service follows. "The company is extraordinarily profitable.

On November 28, Forbes lowered the boom. A cover story featuring Paul's mug asked, "Is Paul Jacobs as good as Dad?" The story pointed to his "low success rate" on various projects and said he "had no experience running the two businesses that provide 90 percent of Qualcomm's \$5.7 billion in sales." It went on to say that he had flopped in some Internet projects and bungled a handset joint venture with Sony. The big blunder: putting a plant in highcost La Jolla while competi-

> tors located their plants in low-wage countries overseas. Qualcomm took a bath on the deal before selling out.

Although some within the company have qualms, the scion has his supporters."Paul Jacobs grew up in the family business, and, in our view, has the necessary tools to steer Qualcomm through its current challenges," says Argus Research.

La Jolla Taco Shop **Cited for Gaud**

n early October a woman phoned Ryan Hill at Don Carlos Taco Shop on La Jolla's Pearl Street to complain about his signs.

They're illegal, and besides that, she ranted, "They are ugly, gaudy, and look like Mexico." Hill, who is Costa Rican on his mother's side, took umbrage at the characterization, especially the derogatory reference to Mexico. "I told her," he says, "that some of the world's most beautiful things are in Mexico and that she

he beat her to the punch, reporting the incident to the La Jolla Light himself. "People at the Light come into my store all the time," he says. In its October 27 issue, the local weekly ran a short article standing up for the taco shop.

To understand the complaining woman's ire, I ask Hill if he recently added new

was treading on dangerous ground with a racist comment like that."

But the woman, who did not identify herself, told Hill that if he didn't take down the signs she would boycott his store, call the La Jolla Light, and file a complaint with the City of San Diego. "I questioned why she would bother city hall about signs at a time when we have such serious financial problems downtown,"Hill says. Then, after she hung up,

signs."I put them up in 2001, when we bought the store, in an effort to make the place more colorful and to increase sales," he tells me. But Hill does admit to putting more "stuff up now and then" since that time.

He says that his Uncle Carlos opened the taco shop in 1984 at the suggestion of English-language students he was teaching in La Jolla who had eaten his food at parties. It is the oldest taco shop in La Jolla, according to Hill. Carlos died in 1998, and three years later his niece, Seidy Hill, bought it from his son. Seidy is the mother of Ryan Hill, who speaks proudly of the store's being a family business. His father, sister, and brother also work at the store.

On October 27, Officer Steven Cousins from the city's Neighborhood Code Compliance Department paid a visit to the shop and gave Hill a written demand to remove his signs. On an "administrative citation," Cousins cited city code: "It is unlawful to display any sign without the required sign permit sticker. Banners, pennants, flags, streamers and other similar devices shall not be permitted." (One can see the city permits, which must be visible, on the large signs of most major businesses.) Cousins then advised the shop owner to "remove all banners from building, railings and patio cover by [November 4] or [a \$100 fine] will be issued."

Hill adamantly contested the citation during his conversation with Cousins. In addition, Hill says that he gave the officer a copy of the La Jolla Light article, which had come out that morning, and vowed to complain to his councilman, Scott Peters. By this time, he says that Cousins had become quite "heated" about their argument.

Hill did not remove the banners and subsequently received a second fine of \$250 for not removing them by December 22. On a visit to the store in early December, I notice, hanging from railings, numerous pennants with Corona beer advertisements. Bright reds, greens, and yellows

eral quarters. It's hopeful, but the jury is still out," says Bud Leedom of *California Stock Report.* Qualcomm refuses to comment.

Like Irwin Jacobs, San Diego's Sol Price is internationally known for his vision. He founded San Diego discounter Fed-Mart in 1954. None other than Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton confessed in his autobiography, "I guess I've stolen — I prefer the word 'borrowed' — as many ideas from Sol Price as from anybody else in the business."

Sol Price sold Fed-Mart to

a German retailer in 1975. It was a mismatch. Sol and his son Robert departed and in 1976 pioneered the concept of the membership warehouse store, the Price Company. It stumbled early, then caught fire, and within three years had 900 employees and a profit of a million dollars. It went public in 1980 and was soon a Wall Street darling. By 1986 it had 22 locations, 7294 employees, and *Forbes*'s title of "best-managed company."

But in 1982, Sol Price lost a longtime protégé, Jim Sinegal, who had done well at both Fed-Mart and Price Company. In 1983, Sinegal and a partner launched Costco Wholesale, another membership warehouse chain that began to grow rapidly, employing many of the ideas Sinegal had learned from Sol Price, such as selling a limited number of items for a low price, keeping costs down, relying on high volume, and paying decent wages. Costco pays employees 42 percent more than Sam's Club, an offshoot of Wal-Mart, and offers a good worker health plan.

In 1993, Price Company and Costco merged. Price had \$7.5 billion in sales and Costco \$6.6 billion at the time. It was to be a marriage of equals with joint headquarters in San Diego and a Seattle suburb. It didn't last long. The Prices shortly went their own way with a company named Price Enterprises that eventually morphed into Price-Smart. It owns warehouse clubs in Central America and the Caribbean, among other places.

Sinegal has become celebrated for paying employees well and himself little. Costco has half the membership warehouse market. Last July, the New York Times called Costco "the anti-Wal-Mart." Fortune Magazine has been laudatory, as have labor unions, although Wall Street with typical avarice complains that Costco is friendlier to employees and customers than to investors. Wall Street's contempt makes Sinegal a populists' hero - and Costco's stock has done well, thank you, down only about \$10 from its precrash 2000 high of \$60.50.

The same can't be said for PriceSmart. Its stock trades at one-sixth its 2000 high. Robert Price has been interim chief executive since 2003. That year, the accounting firm Ernst & Young concluded that the company suffered "material weakness" in its internal controls. PriceSmart overstated revenues during seven quarters of 2002 and 2003 and had to restate profits downward. Shareholders sued and got a \$2.35 million settlement in August 2005. The Securities and Exchange Commission is looking into the matter.

The company has lost money for three years in a row. As an investment, Standard & Poor's says 93 percent of the companies it follows rank higher. Morningstar, Inc., a stock-rating company, gives PriceSmart's growth rate a grade of D, its profitability a D-minus, and its financial position a C-minus.

"The Prices were the pioneers, the visionaries, but Costco had strong management throughout the company," says Leedom. Price-Smart? "It's an entrepreneurial nonentity. As an investment it hasn't proven itself, and I don't see it improving itself soon. It's a mess, and they have shown nothing to Wall Street other than that the mess will continue."

Wall Street continues to scratch its head at Cubic Corcontinued on page 12

poration, which specializes in defense systems and masstransit-fare collection systems. The chairman, chief executive, and president is Walter J. Zable. He founded the company in 1951. He is 90 years old and controls 40 percent of the stock. In this case, the stripling, his son Walter C. Zable, is vice chairman and 58 years old - too old, in some people's eyes, to succeed his father as chief executive. And he has only 1.6 percent of the stock.

"All companies should have managers' retirement no later than 70 years of age, probably earlier," says Allen of Palomar Equity Research. "Cubic has an image problem, having a very old chief executive." "Wall Street is ambivalent,"

says Leedom. "Until there is a leadership change, it is not very interested." The company says five top executives, including the younger Zable, will decide the company's succession plan.

Throughout his lengthy reign, Zable the elder "was very dominating but knew what he was doing. His management style was keeping everybody at everybody else's throat," says Jerry Goodrum, who hated the place so much he lasted only a few months.

The elder Zable "will sit in that chair until he is not capable of sitting in that chair," says Jerry Ringer, who retired after 30 years. "God touched him [the elder Zable] on the shoulder and gave him great strength, physical and mental." Ringer admits to having been fired several times. "Thirty minutes later I would get hired back. It's an emotional place

to work." But Zable has great instincts, says Ringer, although earnings dropped sharply in the last year.

Some former employees doubt the younger Zable will be taking over. Internal speculation is that when the elder Zable can no longer go on, the company will be sold, says one former employee. "There is not high morale there. There is a lot of internal politics," he says.

"The old man never gave his son a chance to succeed," says another former executive. When the elder Zable can go on no longer, "Walter C. [the younger] would be a nonexecutive chairman," current senior executives have told this retired manager."The company could do a search for a chief executive, or realistically put itself up for sale. Prospective buyers have been sniffing around for years."

cer going out and busting people and that the rules he's following are antiquated and need to be revisited."

But Hill's main complaint is that Neighborhood Code Compliance gives competitors in the taco shop business an unfair advantage by making him, but not them, take down signs. Not surprisingly, Steven Cousins and his boss, Tony Khalil, see it differently. Khalil, a senior engineer with the department, tells me shortly after my visit with Hill that the extent of Hill's signage actually gives Don Carlos Taco Shop the unfair competitive advantage." Every inch of that taco shop is covered with signs," he says, "and only 30 percent of a proprietor's linear frontage

is permitted to be covered. How can you defend that? It's unfortunate that the woman who complained about his store used the negative reference to Mexico, because something as egregious as that [much signage] has nothing to do with ethnicity. And if other businesses see them getting away with it, they will follow suit. Anyway, we only asked Don Carlos to remove their banners, and not signs they had painted on the building, because it looked like they had gone to some expense to do

that." Khalil admits that there are uncontested violators of the signage ordinances all over the city. But he cites budget problems as the reason his department "can only be reactive now, no longer proactive. We don't turn our backs on violators, but the Neighborhood Code Compliance Department now is down 12 investigators due to budget issues. We can't even afford business cards," he tells me.

I also speak with Steven Cousins, who tells me that after his visit to the Don Carlos store he went to the other owners Hill had pointed out as being nearby violators of the city's sign ordinances."I canvassed the neighborhood," says Cousins, "and saw nothing similar to what's on the Don Carlos place. But I did inform businesses that had violations, and all of them immediately cooperated and took down the offending signs. But not Hill."

Khalil calls Cousins a "very mild mannered investigator." Cousins recalls his visit with Ryan Hill at the Don Carlos Taco Shop. "He began shaking his fist at me. As I was leaving and going to my car, he was behind me, and I kept turning my head because I didn't know what he was going to do. He followed me, screaming that I was a racist," says Cousins, adding that his wife is Hispanic.

But Hill thinks the issue is bigger than his shop. "Let's look at the city ordinances," he says."How can laws that forbid banners and pennants and yet are violated everywhere in the city be any good?" Nevertheless, shortly after Christmas, to avoid the next fine of \$500, Hill removed all of Don Carlos's offending signs. Officer Cousins made a spot check on January 3 and closed the case. ■





Food Fight

e do programming on software that creates sea surface temperature charts. Twice a day." Speaking is Jeff Gammon, founder/ owner/worker bee of Vista-based Terrafin Software. What Gammon does, for 99 bucks a year per customer, is acquire data from the NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration), Polar Orbiting satellites, and...well, I'll let him tell you.

"Started by creating sea surface temperature charts for my own fishing," Gammon says. "I was taking NOAA coast-watch charts from the Internet, trying to zero in on the right coordinates [based on sea surface temperatures] to use for my own fishing. I fished out of San Diego. Had a 20-footer, fished for albacore, yellowfin tuna, offshore fishing."

I ask, "When was this?"

"Around '98. Then, once I started making my charts, I thought, 'Maybe other people would like to use these charts,' so we put a few on the Internet for free. Then, I looked at my programming background and thought, 'Rather than take two hours to create one chart, I can spend a few months writing software that will create charts quickly.' So, I worked on that for awhile. And then we went to a subscription service."

"Who is 'we'?"

"Me, my wife, who has a real job and supports us," Gammon laughs. "We had 400 subscribers the first year. Went to 800 the second year. Right now, we have 3300 subscribers, and we've expanded into other regions. We do the West Coast, we do all the continental U.S., we do most of Mexico, all of Baja California, all of the Sea of Cortez on down to Acapulco."

I look down at his maps. Gammon has two kinds. The first shows sea surface temperatures (SST). Higher surface water temperature areas are colored orange to red, lower water temperature areas are colored blue to purple. The other set of maps shows chlorophyll concentrations. Gammon tells me that chlorophyll is produced by plankton, and plankton is a food source for bait fish. Areas of the chart colored in red or yellow tones represent chlorophyll-rich areas; blue shades represent low levels of chlorophyll. I ask, "Why do I want these maps?"

Gammon says. "Generally, guys who fish out of San Diego fish for tuna or yellowtail or dorado. They're looking for changes in the water temperature. What these images do," Gammon points to a coastal San Diego SST map, "is illustrate where there's a strong change in temperature in the ocean."

"And fishermen will pay for that information because...?"

"That's where the structure is," Gammon says. "The fish will be on that structure, in most cases, pretty close to the line."

I look at the map again. Next to Ensenada the ocean is colored purple, which, according to the map's legend, is 53 degrees. Next to La Jolla the ocean is colored sky blue, indicating 56 degrees. There's a dark orange blob, looks like it's a couple hundred miles offshore, which indicates 58.5 degrees. Great-looking blobs but, "What is this structure thing? How come fish don't hightail it into the center of their favorite temperature zone if that's where they feel toasty?"

"Food," Gammon says. "Chlorophyll charts give you another clue. What tuna and yellowtail like is clean, blue water, which is *really* low in nutrients. Very little plankton in it, not much there to attract bait fish. But, where that area meets an area with a higher level of plankton, that's where bait fish are likely to be."

I see...small fish are attracted to plankton, big fish are attracted to small fish, everyone meets at the same place, many will die.

Gammon continues, "Food." Big index finger points at a chlorophyll chart. "This is a typical chart that a guy fishing out of San Diego would use. Here are the one-day tuna grounds," big finger points at a dark blue spot in the ocean off Rosarito Beach. "We see a large, bubble of green-colored water in this area," big finger moves north. "This is a 30-mile-in-diameter circle of water. All around the edge of it is cleaner, blue water. That clean blue water is what will hold the fish, along its edges. So, guys are going to want to go out and work around these edges." Big finger moves south. "Or, they may decide to come down here and work these edges."

Always the edges. "Why are edges so important?"

"The edges are the structure. Talk to the bass guys who fish in lakes. They fish the rock piles or they'll fish submerged logs; that's the structure in the lake. In the ocean, off San Diego and Southern California, it's so deep there's not much in the way of structure to affect the surface. So, the currents themselves, where they meet, become the structure offshore. You've got the clean blue highways, and the edges of that is where the food is. Fish want the water that they like and they want food."

Inside the restaurant/bar/video game emporium that is Dave & Buster's, the synth-pop pounded into the Sunday-morning calm, warring with the electronic din from the games. But inside the establishment's showroom, the music was folkier and unguardedly Chris-

Most people sat at tables, chatting; some took a place in the few rows of chairs. "If you've never been here before," said Tabitha,"we just want to thank you for being here. We're going to sing a few songs. If you know the words and you'd like to sing along, go ahead. If not, then just sit and think ... or chat with someone.

The second song was "Amazing Grace," but not your grandmother's "Amazing Grace," or even your mother's. The old melody had been replaced; the familiar, "was blind but now I see" was augmented by "so clearly," and a chorus of sorts has been added: "hallelujah/grace like rain

falls down on me/all my stains are washed away." After a brief welcome video ("We hope you'll

After a other welcome video (we hope you il feel loved here"), Pastor Mat Miller warmed up the crowd while he rattled off the announcements. Newcomers were encouraged to fill out an information card. Very nice. But are they real?"

My friend Kate was interrogating another friend, Sasha, about the glittering row of diamonds on her ring, a present from Sasha's husband on their 10th anniversary. It wasn't the most appropriate thing to ask, but Kate is about to split from her own husband and suspects that her engagement

ring sports a rhinestone instead of a rock. "Something he said once," she says. And Bernice? Bernice these days is "all about CZ blingbling"-cubic zirconium. She's got herself a pair of big square diamond-stud CZ earrings and a pendant

necklace to match. She dares anyone to tell the difference.

I sought some expert advice and found Steve Policastro, a Gemological Institute of America-certified gemologist and owner of the Southern California Gem Lab (619-236-1643) in downtown San Diego. Policastro specializes in identifying and evaluating people's gemstones. I started by ask-

ing him about the real thing. "Diamonds are found pri-

marily in South Africa, Canada, Australia, and Russia. They generally come from deep underground, and are formed by time, pressure, and heat. They're very expensive for a couple of reasons. First, there's a lot of labor involved — they have to be mined; then they have to be sorted according to size and quality. Then they have to be cut and sorted again.'

Quality is determined by several factors. "When you're looking for a quality diamond, you're looking for high clarity — meaning you want few flaws in the diamond, few internal imperfections. There could be garnet inclusions. Generally, though, 'imperfections' refers to something done by Mother Nature during the pressure-and-heating process. Most diamonds have flaws. Flawless diamonds are very, very rare, and that's another reason they're so expensive."

Quality is also determined by color, graded on a descending scale from D to Z. A D diamond will be perfectly

clear; as you go down the scale, you get an increasing degree of yellow. "The public starts to see yellow generally in the I-J-K range, but there are differences at every degree." Cutting provides the final quality factor; hence the re-sorting

Mother Nature takes her sweet time in making a diamond - about a thousand years, by Policastro's estimate. But now, he said, through machines, we can intensify heat and pressure, and make a diamond in days. These are called synthetic diamonds. They haven't perfected the process to the point where they're bringing out flawless diamonds, but they are bringing out lower-quality stones and fancy colored diamonds. Synthetics are not too popular yet; one reason is that the cost is still fairly high compared to a natural stone. People can still buy a natural stone for only 20

percent more, but as more companies get into the synthesizing of diamonds, their price may come down. That may lead people away from the natural diamond market."

After all, said Policastro, a layperson can't tell the difference between natural and synthetic. "Even for gemologists, it's difficult. There is special equipment out now being sold for **\$10,000** to **\$20,000** — that can tell the difference" by detecting differences in the spatial distribution of nitrogen defects in natural and synthetic diamonds.

But if a synthetic diamond is grown in a lab, it is still physically a diamond. "It has the same chemical, physical, and optical properties" as what gets dug out of the ground. Cubic zirconium is also lab-grown, but "it's a totally different stone, and it doesn't have all the same attributes as a diamond. It's an imitation, as opposed to a synthetic." It's got the looks and the sparkle, but "it will scratch much more easily, and it will wear down at the facet junctures.

You'll start to see abrasions and chips on a cubic zirconium much more quickly than on a diamond. And while a diamond will retain some brilliance even when a ring accumulates something like soap scum, a cubic zirconium will lose its brilliance." Policastro said he

could tell the difference

between diamond and cubic zirconium just by looking, thanks to some 20 years of looking at stones. But if there was any doubt, he could check the stone's specific gravity. "A cubic zirconium weighs almost twice as much as a diamond. A diamond with a 6.5mm diameter should weigh close to one carat; a 6.5mm cubic zirconium would weigh 1.85 carats. That's one positive test, but the stones need to be loose for that. There are also scratch tests and thermal conductivity tests."

Last, we came to rhinestones, the cubic zirconium of yesteryear. "Rhinestones are rock crystal quartz — it's a white gemstone that they cut into costume jewelry many years ago. The primary purpose of rhinestones was to imitate diamonds, but the cubic zirconium is a better stone for that." Policastro judged the rhinestone the easiest impostor to spot. Like the cubic zirconium, the rhinestone is not as hard as a diamond, and suffers abrasions more easily. But the cubic zirconium "shows more brilliance. The rhinestone looks different internally; it has to do with the light refraction and reflection inside the stone." Not only that, it's more expensive. "There's a huge range in diamond quality, and so there's a huge range in price. But if you take an average 6.5mm diamond that costs \$5000 wholesale, the same size rock crystal quartz would cost \$3 to \$4, while the same size cubic zirconium would cost \$.50 to \$.75."


THE BEAR OF LEMON GROVE





HEN DEAN HAAS considers his career so far, he describes its most emotionally difficult period as a two-week "hostage situation" involving a group of Americans "who'd gone to look for Noah's ark." mid-'50s and met there, in San Diego. They married in 1958. They lived in Chula Vista, where I was born. My dad owned a small business in Chula Vista called Radio Service Co. He repaired and sold communications equipment. He did TV and stereo repair and sales as well."

Over the nights and mornings Haas and I typed away at each other (Slovenia is nine hours ahead of Pacific Standard Time), I talked with Haas about the peculiarities

"I usually say it this way, 'I'm just a poor boy from Chula Vista.' We were middle class at best. To be honest, I find my job representing my country most fulfilling when I explain my background and say that I made it on merit. A lot of countries, most countries, don't give their citizens that opportunity."

When I spoke with Haas last spring via Internet instant messages, he was ending a three-year tour as deputy chief of mission, or deputy ambassador, at the U.S. embassy in Ljubljana, Slovenia.

"My parents had high expectations of both my sister and me, even though neither of my parents went to college.

"I'm really a Chula Vista native. My dad, who is now deceased, was from Binghamton, New York. My mom was from Duluth, Minnesota. They migrated to California in the

of foreign service life.

"I'm often surprised," Haas told me, "by how little most Americans understand about the work we do."

I understood a little. A friend of mine served in the mid-1990s at the U.S. consulate in Karachi, Pakistan. It was only recently, after having known my friend for several years, that he told me a colleague he'd much admired was killed in Pakistan. At about 7:45 a.m. on Wednesday,

March 8, 1995, at a downtown Karachi intersection, masked gunmen opened fire on a U.S. Consulate van, killing two consulate workers and wounding a third.

My friend didn't say much about the incident. I couldn't tell if this was because what happened was difficult for him to discuss, or if there were intelligence concerns that kept him mum, or if he thought there were aspects of foreign service life that civilians couldn't easily understand. The more I heard about what the State

Department refers to as the "foreign service lifestyle," the more unusual it seemed.

"It's really not all that strange," my friend told me. "There are Americans in Tijuana in the 'foreign service lifestyle.' There's a U.S. consulate in Tijuana. It's big. It's a consulate general. You should talk to them."

Liza Davis, a 34-year-old Virginia native with a creamy complexion and shoulder-length brown

hair, is the person journalists talk to when they want to find out what's going on at the U.S. Consulate General in Tijuana. Davis's title is public affairs officer, and she creates the official face the consulate presents to Mexico and Mexicans and to the Americans whom the consulate serves.

"We're the busiest U.S. consulate in the world," Davis said on the late-spring afternoon we first met. Her tone was upbeat, can-do. "We deal with more deaths, arrests, and injuries of American citizens than any other U.S. consulate.

"We estimate that, at any given moment, there are

250,000 American citizens either living in or visiting the Baja peninsula. And all of those American citizens are deserving of our consular services. We have a whole section for American citizen services. Three or four of our Mexican staff are lawyers. The most senior Mexican employee in our American citizens services section is a lawyer.

"The fundamental reason that consulates and embassies exist is twofold. First, we represent the interests of the United States in foreign affairs — Benjamin Franklin, our first diplomat, was sent to Europe to do that. And, secondly, we protect Americans overseas. Traditionally, those Americans were sailors, and that's why a lot of consulates were in ports. Our fundamental mission is to protect Americans overseas.

"Let's say you come to Tijuana and you get arrested. At this consulate we're so ramped-up on American citizens' services, we don't even wait for you to call. We call the jails, the morgue, and the hospitals every day, in our *whole* consular district, all the way down to Baja South. Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, on holidays and on weekends, we have duty officers who are making those calls. We all take turns as duty officers. We have such good local relationships that we don't usually have a problem where someone molders for a week because no one knew he was an American. We're in there every day saying, 'OK, who have you got?'

"I've seen some of our fellow citizens do some of the *stupidest*, most illegal things possible. But I've also seen plenty of people who were just in the wrong place at the wrong time and through no fault of their own were injured or arrested."

The number of stupid or unlucky Americans whom the consulate helps amazed me.


"About 25 percent of *all* Americans arrested overseas are arrested in our consular district," Davis said. "In the fiscal year 2004, the total arrests of American citizens in the entire Baja peninsula was 2956. We didn't directly come to the aid of all of them, but someone at the very least took a phone call about

them and filled out a form. At the very least the consulate knew they were arrested and was prepared to intervene if necessary. There's everything from arrests for drunk and disorderly conduct to people who were picked up for drug possession or violent crimes. Of those 2956 people arrested, I'd estimate that one-tenth required that we visit them in jail and help them find a lawyer."

To meet Davis, I spent 20 minutes passing through consulate security. A series of large concrete traffic dividers painted Day-Glo orange create an irregular perimeter around the consulate. A dozen or so gray-uniformed guards, all Mexican nationals, patrol this perimeter. The guards wear laminated ID tags that, on the back, describe in English and Spanish the symptoms of



exposure to biological and chemical agents.

Sitting on a slight rise across the street from the Tijuana racetrack, the consulate, built in 1961, is a spare three-story rectangular structure faced in white marble. The building's simplicity, and its proximity to, of all things, a racetrack, suggest an era when American power in general and America's relationship with Mexico were less complex. If the consulate's present security arrangement appears provisional, it's because, as Liza Davis told me, the State Department is now looking to buy land for a new and much larger Tijuana consulate. Real estate prices in central Tijuana mean that the new consulate will likely be built farther out.

"The consulate's permanent staff," Davis said, "are already dreading the commute."

Before I could meet Davis, I had to pass through the security booth on the consulate's west side, where two armed guards flanked a heavily reinforced window. Another guard, behind the window, communicated via intercom with all visitors. Inside the booth, three other guards manned an X-ray machine and metal detector. No cigarettes, cigarette lighters, or matches, no cell phones or other "electronic equipment" are allowed to be taken into the consulate. The guards examined my blazer and my blazer's pockets. They examined my shoulder bag and its contents. There was debate as to whether or not my tape recorder constituted "electronic equipment." While one guard made calls regarding the tape recorder, another scrutinized my photo ID and business card. The phone rang: my tape recorder could enter the

consulate.

The consulate's lobby resembles every waiting room you've ever seen in any U.S. government agency: rows of plastic chairs face a wall of bankteller-type windows. Above the windows hang framed headshots of President Bush, Vice President Cheney, and former Secretary of State Colin Powell. (As of this writing, the consulate had yet to receive Secretary Rice's official photograph from the U.S. embassy in Mexico City.) To the lobby's left, a massive metal gate opens to a stairwell leading to the consulate's offices. Upstairs, the surroundings would soothe even the most ardent small-government zealot. Bookcases packed with books on American art, history, and literature line narrow hallways. Posters about Fulbright scholarships adorn office doors.

representative in Mexico. He is the highest-ranking U.S. government official in Mexico. What he says goes in Mexico. Also, my boss is the public affairs officer at the embassy in Mexico City. He's technically in charge of the public affairs programming in Mexico. I also report to the consul general here. And I also report to the

Western Hemisphere Bureau at the State Department in Washington.

"If the ambassador wants to do something in a big policy way, if he wants to change U.S. policy in Mexico, I'm not doing that. And I'm not talking directly to Washington about that, nor should I be. That's all



Here, it's staggered." With a constantly changing staff, who maintains the consulate's institutional memory?

"To a large extent it's our locally engaged staff. That's why every embassy and consulate has a majority of locally engaged staff. My staff, for example, are professional staff members. Lorena is like a media executive in many senses. She's in charge of all our press relations, and it's her job to maintain those relations no matter who the public affairs officer is. Lorena knows who all the players are in the media."

Davis's manner was casual and outgoing, and when I asked about her personal history, her accent changed, little by little, from generic American to soft Southern drawl.

"I was born and raised in Lexington, Virginia, three hours south of DC. I majored in German at the University of Virginia, and I have yet to serve in Germany. I had the classic liberal arts education. I also studied French and a little bit of Russian. You'll find that you really can't generalize about foreign service officers. There are a lot of international relations majors, journalists, everything. Some went to the Georgetown School of Foreign Service, and some went to the University of Oregon. They come from all over.

"Right after college, I took the foreign service exam. I heard about it at a cocktail party. A distant relative said, 'Oh, you majored in German. You should take the foreign service exam.' And I said, 'Really, what's that?' And it just sort of snowballed from there. I took the exam at the University of Virginia in 1986. I was literally laughing while I was taking the exam, because it was so hard. It's changed some since I took it, but generally speaking, it's not like all those tests that you took



as a kid that measure your ability to learn. It tests what you *know*.

"There are sections on economics, macroeconomics, on world history. There are questions on the arts. For example, when I took the exam there was a Dorothea Lange photo and you had to identify who the photographer was. Another question was, 'Who is the director of the American Ballet Theatre?' — at that time it was Mikhail Baryshnikov, which I knew. The exam was very broad and very difficult. There was and still is a part of the exam devoted to English and English grammar. You must pass that section in order to pass the exam. I know that nonnative speakers of English find that section very difficult.

"So, you take the exam and you wait months and months to hear if you've passed. If you do pass, then you schedule the oral exam, which you can take in DC or at several other locations across the country. It's a day-long series of activities with other exam-takers. Generally speaking, it's role-playing. I took the oral exam in DC. We had to role-play an embassy staff meeting. They don't tell you what they're grading you on. They give you a situation and they refuse to answer questions. At our 'embassy staff meeting,' we'd each been given a program that we had to defend funding for. I was given a proposal for giving a radical student group a photocopier and a van. Obviously, they were grading us on our interpersonal skills. I defended the photocopier but not the van, because I felt that it would be 'irresponsible' to give a student group a van. On and on it went. A whole day of this kind of stuff. Now, apparently, they do talk to you about yourself. Back when I did the oral exam, they didn't. They asked me, 'Name five

American authors who you think best represent U.S. literature and explain why.'

"Mysteriously, I passed the oral exam as well. If you pass the oral exam, you're given a background clearance in

which they literally interview just about everyone you've ever known. They interviewed every landlord of every student apartment I lived in when I was in college, some of whom had never met me. They interviewed every employer I'd ever had for every job I'd ever had, even as a teenager. They spoke to friends. They work from a list that you give them, but they also ask each person they interview, 'Who *else* should I talk to?' So, they descended on my hometown. It was just the *talk of the town* the day they were there, because they fanned out through the town, doing it as quickly as possible. For some people it takes longer. If I had traveled all over commu-

nist Europe, for example, my background check would have taken *forever*.

"And then you have your medical clearance. They pay for you to have the most exhaustive physical you can ever imagine. "If you pass all of

that, you're put on a waiting list for jobs, and you're rank-ordered on that waiting list. I don't understand the mysteries of it. But apparently now, for example, you can get a 'veteran's preference' that will put you above other people on the list. You have a certain amount of time to be offered a job from that waiting list, or it's over. If you want to try again, you have to start all over from the beginning and take the exam again. When I was on the list, the waiting period was 18 months.

"The year that I took the written foreign service exam, 15,000 other people took it. Of that 15,000, 250 people were eventually hired."

Davis's first post was, she told me, at the U.S. embassy in Buenos Aires. She explained that early in the exam process, the career of a potential foreign service officer, or FSO, is directed toward one of five employment tracks or "cones": management, which deals with the day-to-day financial, logistical, and personnel concerns of running an embassy or consulate; consular, which handles issuing visas to foreign nationals and troubleshooting the many problems Americans encounter while abroad, such as imprisonment, death, and lost passports; economic, which involves advocacy for American business interests and analysis of foreign markets and the economic policies of foreign governments; *political*, which requires monitoring foreign political events and forming recommendations for U.S. policy; and public diplomacy, which tackles the promotion and explanation of U.S. policy and culture via media relations, education, conferences, and exchange programs.

Davis was directed to the public diplomacy cone.

"I was in DC for one year, being trained, and

then I was in Buenos Aires for three years. At the embassy level, the public diplomacy, or public affairs, section is huge. We have a cultural attaché, a press attaché. Each has an American officers staff. The public affairs section does everything from running libraries to making sure that U.S. policy is correctly stated in the local media. All of those jobs fall within the 'public diplomacy cone.' The training for those jobs takes place in DC.

"I know it's better now than when I did it. I know they now train you on how to give an interview. They have a course where they tape you giving interviews, and they critique them. My cone tends to attract people who have some experience in those things educators, journalists, art historians. But that doesn't necessarily mean that they know how to give a good press interview or a speech or program an event. So, there's a certain amount of training and a certain amount of on-the-job experience that's involved.

"When I went to Buenos Aires I was the 'exchanges officer,' which meant that I had a staff and we managed the 'professional program' in which we sent Argentine professionals to the U.S. for study tours and we also brought Americans down to give speeches and conferences. I had a professional Argentine staff who all had 20 years of experience and I had the support of the bureau back in Washington. So I did learn a lot on the job, but it wasn't as though I was immediately in charge of the entire embassy."

I asked Davis who kept tabs on the personnel needs of all U.S. consulates and embassies.

"It's out of Washington. It's pre-programmed. I know when I get to a post when it is that I'll be leaving. So does Washing-

ton. For example, if I were posted in China, which requires two years of language study, by the time I got to my post, my successor would have already been chosen and would be studying Chinese. "After my tour in

Buenos Aires, I went to Managua, Nicaragua, for two years. I was there during the 'good time.' I was there during the last two years of Violeta Chamorro's presidency. The way it works is that the length of a tour

depends on where you are. A tour in Baghdad right now could be only one month. Western Europe, it's four years. It depends on the place, the hardship level, the danger level. At the time I was in Nicaragua, it was a


'greater hardship post.' It was still on the cusp of potential unrest politically. It was tropical, so the weather was a factor. There are a lot of factors that go into the designation of 'hardship post.'

"Buenos Aires, for

instance, probably doesn't now have a 'hardship level,' but it probably does have a cost-of-living allowance. There are three types of extra pay you can get. There's a cost-of-living allowance for posts like Tokyo, where prices

are outrageous. Then there's 'danger pay' for posts like Baghdad or Bogotá. That's a percentage of salary depending on the level of danger and can be anywhere from 5 to 25 percent of your salary. And then there's hardship pay, which can be between 5 to 20 percent of your salary. There are different kinds of hardship — weather, remoteness, pollution, altitude. Mexico City, for example, has altitude and bad air pollution.

"After Nicaragua, I was in DC for six years and did two different jobs there based on my cone. And then I came here." It seemed to me that while it might be nice to get extra compensation for air pollution and stress, the "foreign service lifestyle" had to have its own costs.

"I'm single, so I don't have any of the issues of having a family," Davis said. "But I still haven't decided if I want to do this for a living. Even being a single person, to move every two to four years? Well, I don't have any junk in my closet, that's for sure. It's difficult. Every two to four years you get a new job, a new place to live, new culture, new language, new friends, new coworkers.

In the civilian world, you might change one or two of those things every now and then. But, in the foreign service, yes, it's difficult."

This difficulty interested me, and I told Davis that I was interested in meeting people who, given other options, had chosen the "foreign service lifestyle." A while later, Davis introduced me to Susan Page, the consulate's management officer.

"She's the person who makes the consulate run," said Davis.

Chic, blonde, somewhere in her forties, Page has a firm handshake and is, as her title suggests, in the "management cone." Page told me she was from Seattle and had entered the foreign service in 1990.

"And in Seattle you were..." I hear myself ask in the recording of our interview.

I count five seconds between the time when my breathy, nasal voice fades away and when Page, her voice clear, declarative, answers. "I was sort of a lawyer. In Seattle."

"Yeah," laughed Liza Davis, who sat in on the interview. *"Sort of a* lawyer."

Davis's tone sug-

gested that Page was engaging in understatement.

There was another pause.

"Well, I was sort of a contract lawyer," Page continued. "And then I was sort of a beach bum. I was doing a lot of things."

How had Page learned about the foreign service?

"I think I was looking for another job, and it was in some sort of legaljob newsletter or something. And I just took the test and I passed the *first time*.

"This is my fourth or fifth post. I was in Bogotá, Colombia. Shanghai. Barbados. Lithuania. And now Tijuana. This is my *fifth* post. They were all great. Bogotá was OK, but all the rest of them were very good."

I asked Page at what point in her career the difficulty of foreign service life was made clear to her.

"It was pretty much what I expected. If you've already lived overseas on your own, then living overseas under the aegis of the U.S. government is pretty nice. I'd already lived overseas, in Puerto Vallarta, and so I had a good idea of what I was getting into."



service must present challenges even to people who've already lived overseas.

"You have to learn how to make friends with people quickly. I'll tell you, I have an extra burden because I'm single. If you're single, you don't have a built-in companion to go out to try restaurants and go places with. I don't have that. And so I don't experience as much as a married couple does. And that's...unfortunate.

"But I'm kind of a loner anyway, so I'm perfectly content. I sort of take whatever social life there is and make the best of it. People say to me, 'Oh, social life in the foreign service must be difficult for a single woman.' Well, let me tell you, a middle-aged single woman in Washington DC has no social life with men, you know, or in San Francisco. A woman of a certain age doesn't have a social life anywhere. So, wherever you are doesn't really matter, frankly."

A young man in blazer and tie dropped by to join our conversation. "Susan," the young

man said, "could have fun at an insurance convention."

He introduced himself as Chris Bronk, said he was a vice consul.

"He just got back from defending his Ph.D.," said Davis. "Political science,"

said Bronk. "Syracuse." Bronk said he grew

up in New York, in Westchester County, and that he joined the foreign service in 2002.

"This is my first tour. It's been my 'visa tour.' I'm right at the end of it. I'll be going to DC for kind of a goofy job. I'm going to be a consultant in the Office of E-Diplomacy. It's basically figuring out how to use computers more effectively in various levels of the State Department. Using cutting-edge resources."

Bronk said that before entering the for-

eign service, he and his wife, a corporate lawyer, had lived in Seoul, South Korea, a "crushingly xenophobic place," where he worked for a Korean government agency. He said he loved living overseas.

"But when I got out of college in the early 1990s, the foreign service wasn't hiring," he said.

"Oh, yeah," said Page. "There was pretty much a hiring freeze after I got in."

"At the close of Madeleine Albright's tenure running the Department," Bronk continued, "she initiated some hiring, which became what is now known as the 'Diplomatic Readiness Initiative,' which eventually hired 1500 foreign service officers. I was one of those. The hiring process was streamlined under Secretary Powell. I passed the exam in 2000 and eventually received an offer of employment eight weeks after 9/11."

"Fundamentally, [hiring] all comes down to money," said Davis. "So, for example, when you have to open a new gigantic embassy like the one in Baghdad, new money just doesn't appear. In that case they had what was referred to in shorthand as the 'Iraq tax,' which was that bureaus and posts all over the world had to give up positions and budget in order to transfer not the people but the positions and the money to fund them for Baghdad. The problem is that it comes down to money and what Congress allocates. And Congress, of course, doesn't give you everything you ask for."

The prospect of serving in Baghdad reminded me that on unofficial foreign service websites I'd perused, foreign service officers who'd served at the consulate in Tijuana were very enthusiastic about it. I asked Davis, Page, and Bronk what made the Tijuana post

"We're ten minutes from San Diego," said Page, "which is probably the most livable city in the United States. And if you've lived overseas for 15 straight years, like I have, this is like doing a stateside assignment while still living overseas and having your housing provided. I feel like I'm living in a Mexican barrio in the United States, but I'm having my housing provided and I'm still in the foreign service."

I asked if the State Department required all foreign service officers at the consulate to live in Tijuana.

"We have to," said Davis. "And we all do." "This is," said Page, "a

foreign service post." "And we're all on

call," said Bronk, "all the time." "But we don't live

across the border from any dumpy city," said Page. "We live across the border from San Diego."

"And people with kids can send them to school in San Diego," said Davis.

"Although there's one family at this post that sends their kids to a

"I think it's all personality-driven," said Page. "And I think it's all a moveable feast. It changes



"There are two things every post submits," explained Page. "A post submits a 'differential report' and a 'post report.' The differential report is to get as high an allowance as possible. Differential reports make every post sound like a hellhole. The 'post report' makes every post sound very desirable because it's a recruiting tool, and it's to make people want to go and live there."

"Baghdad has a hardship differential of 25 percent," said Davis. "Kabul has 25 percent. For all posts in Argentina, it's zero. Dacca, Bangladesh, is 25. Micronesia, 20. Mexico City, 15." The selaries in gues

The salaries in question are difficult for a civilian to get a feel for. Like salaries for all government jobs, those in the foreign service follow a pay scale. But the foreign service pay scale sometimes changes as administrations come and go, and as Congress warms or cools toward the State Department.

From listening to Davis, Page, and Bronk, the consensus seemed to be that the more "policyminded" secretaries of state tended to pay less attention to the financial needs of the State Department. Colin Powell, everyone seemed to agree, was very "hands-on" with managing the Department and diligent about lobbying for resources. "He had *a lot* of pull with Congress." Their attitude toward Secretary Rice was wait-and-see. Their discussion of their salaries went as follows:

"I came in as a 5," said Davis, referring to her initial pay grade. "My starting salary 15 years ago was \$35,000. Technically, the lowest starting salary right now for a foreign service officer is \$24,677. The top salary now for a foreign service officer is for an ambassador who's been a career diplomat, and that's \$180,000. The top salary

for a political appointee, meaning an ambassador appointed by the president, is \$149,000."

"I came in as a 5.13," said Page. "My starting salary was \$37,500." "I came in as a 4.9,"

can Foreign Service Association, an EX-V pay grade. This means his annual salary is, according to the inscrutable Foreign Service Salary Table, somewhere around \$131,000. This salary is either generous or so-so depending on how much you might enjoy moving back and forth, as Stewart has, between Washington DC and Trinidad and Tobago, Mexico, Germany, Romania, the Bahamas, and Pakistan, for more than 20 years with a wife and five kids, including a daughter with a severe developmental disability. Several weeks after

my first visit to the consulate in Tijuana, Liza Davis introduced me to Stewart, a tall, trim, amiable Texan, handsome in the way that father figures in commercials for brokerage houses or engagement rings are handsome. Stewart projected a calm optimism that was most apparent in the all-in-aday's-work way he described some of the "challenges" he's faced at this post. "We had the closure

down here of these behavior-modification centers, these sort of tough-love centers for American kids who have drug-abuse or emotional problems. The Mexican government decided to close them down. We got notice that *morning* that they'd decided to close them down. We immediately sent people to each of the three places around Ensenada. The [Mexican government] was in the process of deporting people. We had one junior officer at one of these schools where there were four or five hundred kids. All U.S. nationals. And these are kids who were sent there because of emotional or drug problems. This happened on a parent weekend when there were 100 parents down there getting reintroduced to their kids, who were in a very structured environment. All of a sudden they see these guys in black uniforms blockading the school. It looked pretty ominous. You know, 'men in black.' The parents didn't know what was going on. We had a consular officer, a first-year junior officer, who went down there and was holding town-hall meetings, telling the parents, 'Your kids are OK!'

"The Mexican government closed the schools down, which meant that the schools lost their authority real fast. And these kids figured out, 'Hey, we're going home!' So, our security officer was also there. Our staff was there trying to manage the situation before it degenerated into a Lord of the Flies scenario, which was a very, very real possibility. At one point there

were three fights going on simultaneously. But we handled it. We did a *fantastic* job down there.

"We had another situation in which someone came by the consulate and said, 'This baby's an American and I'm leaving it. Bye!' It was a Friday afternoon. The first thing we had to do was run around the consulate and ask, 'OK, who knows how to change diapers?' And we had to send someone out to buy some." ("The baby was eventually repatriated," Liza Davis later told me. "We had to track it through footprints on baby records. It was a *nightmare*.")

Incidents like those, Stewart said, demonstrate what makes the Tijuana post unique. The border itself, the constant interplay between the U.S. and Mexico, creates the sorts of problems "you certainly wouldn't deal with if you were posted in

"You get 15-year-old kids who decide to skip school and they go to a foreign country, Mexico. That sort of problem. You wouldn't encounter it at other posts. Kids just don't skip school and get on a plane to the Bahamas."

Stewart, who said he entered the foreign service in 1981, seemed so unflappable that I wondered about his background.

"I went to college at Harvard, where I studied economics. I got a master's at Duke. After college, my wife and I took a year and traveled around the world. We had two shoulder bags. We were on a ten-dollar-aday budget. Actually, our first child was born in the Philippines. That was my first contact with the State Department, when I went to the embassy to register our daughter as an Amer-

ican citizen.

"My wife is from Austria and was the daughter of missionaries in Africa. She was the first European baby born in the kingdom of Rey Bouba in northern Cameroon. The king proposed to her family, and she would have been his 51st wife. But they didn't take him up on the offer. Thank goodness they turned him down.

"I taught high school for two years in Virginia. And I taught a year in India at an embassy school. My background isn't like that of military or foreign service brats for whom going into government service is just something that you do. There was no tradition of that in my family, but all four of my adult kids are all working for the government.

"I took the foreign service exam before I went to India. It was very interesting because I was teaching the children of diplomats and that sort of gave me insight into foreign service life. One of my concerns was the stress and strain on the family. My personal view is that most people I know who leave the foreign service leave for family reasons. It's not the terrorism or the hardship. Most of us adapt to that. Spousal employment issues. Children's educational issues. Those are some of the big issues that cause people to leave.

"When I joined the foreign service, I said I'd never go to Mexico. It's so close you think you know it. But I've ended up serving in Mexico twice. I was in the consular cone. In the old days the political and economics officers were the ones who generally got the leadership jobs and became ambassadors. That's really changed. The consular





get very involved in protecting American citizens. Where I would get involved would generally be in instances of avoiding problems. We worked with the Tijuana mayor's office to have students pass out flyers during spring break that discouraged students from buying drugs. I'd also deal with problems of police extortion.

"Something that I and the Mexican consul general in San Diego organized, with my initiative, is a mechanism through which officials from all three levels of both governments can get together and address problems. Back in the old days, if you had a problem such as, say, a Tijuana policeman came across the border with his gun and got arrested, you'd have to go through Washington and Mexico City to deal with it. Now we can deal with it locally.

"Regarding the issue of Mexican police mistreating American visitors, we were able to use this mechanism to get the San Diego chief of police over here to meet with the Baja attorney general and work out an arrangement. A victim of crime here, especially if the perpetrator was a policeman, would usually want to get out of Mexico. The first person to hear about the crime was usually a U.S. law-enforcement official. Now we've worked out a way for U.S. law enforcement to take down the information, send it to us here at the consulate, and let us make sure it gets to the Mexicans. We don't want criminals to benefit either way."

I asked Stewart what he had learned about Tijuana through his interaction with the city.

"I think in a lot of ways Tijuana looks very, very different from the

United States. But in a lot of ways they share many of the values that we have, because Tijuana is a city of migrants. In most parts of the world where we foreign service officers serve, we interact with elites in traditional societies that have always been in charge. You know, their grandfather was a friend of the British governor, and now they're a friend of the U.S. consul general. In Tijuana, it's like many parts of our country; it's a very young city. Most of the leaders here in Tijuana, hardly any of their grandparents are from here.

"In some ways, that can make my work harder. In most places in the world, there are only a few players. And even in Mexico, it can be that way. When I talk to a colleague in, say, Mérida or Guadalajara, I hear that these are 500-year-old cities where the So-and-

So families have always been running things. In those places, there are fewer people you have to get to know. And, remember, when we come to a post, we have to become instant experts.

"So, Tijuana's got a rough kind of appearance, but at its core it's got a lot of the values we have. People who are not so well off in other parts of Mexico, who have the spunk and the courage and the get-up-and-go attitude, come up here. And that's basically our story. It's a self-made town. Another aspect is that Tijuana doesn't get a lot of resources from the federal government in Mexico City. Mexico City may have a heavily federally funded opera or symphony, but here it's very grassroots. And that's very American, too. It's very from-the-ground-up." Since Stewart was entering the final year of his tour in Tijuana, I

asked what his plans

were. "I thought very seriously about quitting the foreign service during my third tour, when I was in Pakistan. There were family reasons, and career reasons. Later on I spoke with the director general of the Foreign Service, who's in charge of all personnel. I thought I was really unique. And the director general basically said, 'Everyone thinks about quitting on their third tour.' And a lot do. Your first tour is your excursion tour, your

tourist tour, you're overseas in a new country and you're loving it. On your second tour you go somewhere else, and it's different and you love it. You've gone from China to Africa or to Europe. By the third tour you think, 'This is getting old.' It's like the seven-year itch. So, a lot of people on their third tour leave before it's too late. But the director general told me, 'Listen, David, if you haven't left by your third tour, quit complainin'. Quit complainin'. If you haven't quit by your third tour, you're too vested. You're not gonna leave.' So, obviously, I never left. I'm in for the long haul.

"For my next post, either I will go to a real difficult, hard place, and



my wife and daughter will go to New Mexico, where we have a home, or my wife, daughter, and I will go to London, Paris, Rome, or Madrid. We'd like to be in Europe."

Stewart's main concern was, he said, his daughter with Down syndrome, who will soon be leaving the Kentucky boarding school she's attended since 1998.

"The continuity's been better for her there. She's on the basketball team. She has a boyfriend. She has a very full life there. We're very grateful for that. She flies out here every couple of months, and that's one of the reasons why Mexico and the Caribbean worked out for us. She had to be able to fly to us easily.

"The problem with foreign service assignments is that you're always trying to find a place that's good for your career and that's good for your family. It's always a compromise. The fact of the matter is that the State Department has been very supportive, but the reality is that most of the world doesn't provide what your average American takes for granted in an American public school."

Lorena Blanco, Liza Davis's assistant and the consulate's media coordinator, is planning to move on, too. Although, she says, "It will probably take me at least five years to get American citizenship. I don't get any special treatment just because I

work at an American consulate."

Blanco is a petite woman, a mother of two sons, who's one of those Tijuana natives who learned to speak excellent English by watching American television.

"I remember I used to watch The Brady Bunch, and The Osmonds, and that cartoon, Underdog



"Because I was born and raised here at the border, I didn't grow up thinking of San Diego as foreign. We crossed back and forth across the border all the time. There was one that had a pool. We'd go there and it cost 25 cents. San Diego and Tijuana weren't separate to me. They blended into a region.

The English courses were very easy for me. After high school I went to work for an airline, Aeroméxico. I started out working at passenger check-in at the airport. The job gave me a lot of opportunities to travel. All over Mexico, Europe, the Bahamas,

said, 'Sure!' This was right after Aeroméxico went bankrupt and working conditions were pretty hard. So, in the VIP room I started talking to the U.S. consul and he asked me about my job. I explained that things had gotten difficult, and he said, 'Would you be interested in working at the consulate?' I said, 'Why not?' And he wrote down the name and phone number of the consulate's administration officer

and said, 'Give him a call and tell him that you're calling on behalf of Larry Colbert.' "

Eventually, Blanco was hired as a clerk in the immigrant-visa section.

"What many people probably don't know is that in order for the State Department to hire foreign service nationals like me, we have to get approval, as a matter of protocol, from the Mexican foreign ministry to be allowed to work for the U.S. government. I got approval.

"By 1993 the immigrant-visa section was closed, and all the immigrant-visa work for all of Mexico was sent to Ciudad Juárez. So, here, they laid off around 30 people. But there was one job opening, and that was as receptionist for the consul general. Five people applied, including me, and I got the job. Previous receptionists didn't speak any Spanish. After working in that job for two years, I got this position.

"I had three weeks of training in Washington and two other U.S. cities, Atlanta and Portland. We were taken to newspapers to meet editors. We were taken to CNN. In Portland, we visited local newspapers. In Washington, we got to know the State Department and learned how to treat the media. It was pretty useful.

"The highlight of this position is creating channels of communication between the U.S. government, which we represent, and the Mexican public. I deal with all the media here in Tijuana, radio, TV, print. I'd guess around 20 different media outlets. We also deal with U.S. media. Any media who call from either side of the border talk to me. Only three people at the consulate are authorized to talk to the media: the consul general, Liza, and me.

"Every day I read all the local papers and read all the news. I tape and watch one news broadcast from Mexico City. I monitor the local radio stations in Tijuana, which is important because people will call in to complain about how they get treated at the consulate, or they call in with visa questions. All the radio announcers refer those people to me."

During her time as the consulate's media coordinator, Blanco has, she said, weathered several "extremely, extremely difficult situations": first, the eviction in 1999 of more than 100 Americans who owned property at the Punta Banda beachfront development in Baja California. Also in 1999, San Diegan Donald Kraft,



involved in a car accident north of Ensenada, died after Mexican authorities refused to let him cross the border for medical treatment. In September 2004, as Consul General Stewart described, Mexican authorities shut down the behavior-modification centers in Ensenada.

September 11, however, was "really, really terrible" for Blanco.

"They shut down the border. They closed the consulate. Everyone else, except us, of course, was sent home. My public affairs officer was just stuck to the television, and he wasn't taking care of the media. So, I had to do all of the media. And we were getting tons of media. We had one TV reporter, a woman, who came down here to the consulate in her pajamas to get a statement from us. Of course I talked to them all, saying, 'We're in shock. We had to close the consulate.' So at 1:00 a.m. I went out in back of the consulate and started crying and crying. I don't even want to remember it."

Had her job changed her perception of America?

"I went from a 100 percent Mexican company to working for a 'foreign' enterprise. It's odd, isn't it? My perception of the United States has always been that it was a very strong and important country. Although I've always lived here in Tijuana, my goal is to someday live in the States. I don't want to remain here.

"I know it's not good to compare. When I worked for Aeroméxico, I loved my job. But, to make the comparison, it's so much better for me to work with U.S. employers. I loved my job with a Mexican company, but Mexican employers, although they care for their employees, they like them to be very simple and subservient. I didn't like that.

"It's totally different

working for a U.S. entity or place like this one, as opposed to working for Mexicans. Where I worked, for example, there was always favoritism, and that doesn't happen here at the

consulate. Everyone is more equally treated, and I really appreciate that.

"I basically know that Americans are so different from us. We're more driven by heart. We're very, I don't want to say


situation, I would prefer that, because Americans like people to bring results to what you're doing. I remember at Aeroméxico, we were closely monitored by the management. Here at the

"I am a Tijuanense, a Tijuana native, but things have gotten so bad here. In terms of crime, in terms of public safety. I read the papers every day. I know what's going on here. Crossing the border has become so difficult. In the past two years, it's been more and more on my mind. In the past two years, it's gotten more difficult to live here.

"I have two sons, and they were born in the United States. We paid for our own medical expenses. Our sons can have dual nationality. I would eventually like to live in the United States, work as something like, I don't know, a spokesperson for CalTrans. I know there are plenty of openings, because the need for bilingual professionals is growing and will continue to grow."

I asked if Blanco's

work at the consulate had made her in some ways American.

"I think that I've always been American. In the sense that I've always spent half of my time there. I live and work here, but I tend to spend all of my free time there. It's like I'm split. I'm 50-50. I'm a very typical Baja Californian.

"I love my city. I love Tijuana. I was born and raised here. But things have changed so much that I don't want to spend the rest of my life here. And that makes me sad, because I love Tijuana so much."

As Blanco and I were finishing up, Liza Davis stopped by Blanco's office and offered to take me to her apartment to see "how a public affairs officer lives." Davis and I cruised out of the consulate's parking lot in a hefty SUV with diplomatic plates. A few minutes later we were pulling into her two-car garage in Chapultepec, one of Tijuana's swankier neighborhoods.

"My commute takes as much time as listening to one song on the radio," said Davis, ushering me inside her white, airy, three-bedroom, two-bath home. A two-level patio at the back of the house looks out over the Tijuana golf course and, beyond the green, to the Tijuana Country Club where, a few days before my visit, ten masked gunmen dressed in black had in full daylight abducted a gentleman from the club's entrance.

"The State Department rents places all over the world and owns only a few," Davis said. "Here in Tijuana, we own a couple of apartments. In all cases, a security officer has to come around and check out the place's security. They will usually

negotiate with the landlord to do any upgrades, like the bars here on all the windows and the alarm system."

On the big white northern wall in Davis's living room hangs a collection of 16 different paintings depicting a natural land bridge.

"My hometown is in Rockbridge County," said Davis. "It was at one time part of property owned by Thomas Jefferson. And George Washington as a very young man surveyed it, and his initials are still carved into the side of the land bridge. Now a highway goes across the top of it."

Our voices echo in the large room.

"The weight allowance for every move is 9000 pounds for a single person," explained Davis. "I don't have anywhere near 9000 pounds. If you're going to a place that's completely unfurnished, it's 18,000 pounds."

Davis patted the back of a chair upholstered in cream-colored damask.

"This place is semifurnished. This chair belongs to the State Department. That 'charming' oak-veneer chest over there belongs to the government, too. There's a catalog, but you don't get to choose from it. It shows all the State Department furniture's basic sets in three or four different styles. So when we go to each other's houses, we say things like, 'Oh, I had that same furniture in Eritrea!' If you're very unlucky you end up in a place where they've kinda cobbled together stuff. In the dining room, for example, the table will be one style and the chairs another."

Among the few pieces of furniture Davis brought with her to Tijuana is a Shaker rocking chair. I asked if anything in the apartment was particularly meaningful to her.

"I used to say that I would never take any-

thing overseas that I would mind if it fell off the boat. I do have my great-grandmother's china, 19th-century china. Her name was Izora Patrick. Her ancestors came over from Scotland. And I use her china. I used to have it packed in boxes thinking, 'Well, I'm just not going to take it with me.' But I thought, 'That's ridiculous. Why should I deny myself the use of it?' So I have heirlooms that I do take with me. But if I were going to a place like Liberia where they might have to evacuate me quickly, I wouldn't take that kind of stuff."

In a den to one side of the living room stood a card table on which Davis had heaped a confusion of papers, magazines, photographs.

"In the foreign service, you're always purging," Davis explained. "You're always getting rid of things you don't really

need.'

Looking at the jumble of stuff, I had a sense of the demands that globe-trotting makes on a person's life. I thought of a conversation I'd had with someone who's lived next door to people in the foreign service.

Two thousand six hundred eighty miles from Liza Davis's home, Robin Yi, a 40-year-old San Diego native and SDSU graduate, lives in Vienna, Virginia. Yi, who did postdoc work in psychology at Johns Hopkins, lives in Vienna with her husband and 3-yearold daughter. Yi describes her community as a "parklike suburb about 15 miles west of Washington DC." She says many foreign service families choose Vienna because its schools are good and its housing is less expensive than that of areas nearer the capital.

"In one of these families we made friends with, the plan was that the husband was here in DC to learn some Slavic language. He was suddenly posted in Iraq, and because of the security situation there, his family couldn't go with him. The wife moved to be closer to her family in southern Virginia. In another family we know, the husband was here learning Arabic and expected to be posted in Saudi Arabia. But he was suddenly sent to Iraq. His wife returned to Mexico City, where she was from, so that she and the kids could be near her family. Another family we got close to fairly quickly has suddenly left for Singapore. Our kids had just two playdates before the family left for Singapore.

"I don't regret meeting or making friends with any of these people. I'm sure we'll make friends with other foreign service families in the future. Nobody has a guarantee that they're going to be doing just one thing and be staying in just one place. These folks are guaranteed that they're *not* going to be staying in any one place for very long. They're very good about keeping in touch. We exchange email addresses and write back and forth. We sometimes talk on the phone. What I've realized, now that I understand the foreign service a little better, is that these folks come back to DC eventually, so it's not as though we'll *never* see them again. It's something we can look forward to."

After we left Davis's house, she dropped me near my car, not far from the consulate. Wind blowing from the southwest smelled of rain. Sunlight slanting through coastal clouds illuminated

the hillsides north of Zona Rio. The contrast between the rickety homes on those hills and the gardens and high walls of Chapultepec is one you find all over Latin America, all over the developing world. For an instant I had the sensation of not knowing where I was, that I could have been anywhere, really, far from home. It requires a certain personality to take disorientation in stride.

"I've always been pretty straitlaced and disciplined," Dean Haas told me the last time we spoke. "I was a good student always. No smoking, no drinking, no rebellion, no drugs. *Never*. My parents always had high expectations, and I learned later in life that parental expectations are a key to success for many kids. My parents insisted on good behavior in school even more than good grades. The nuns at Catholic school helped with this a bit, too.

"I attended St. Pius X Elementary School, then Bonita Vista Junior and senior High Schools. I graduated UCSD in 1983 with a major in history and with minors in economics and English literature. In 1985, at Point Loma College, I took the foreign service exam pretty much on a lark. And I passed! The more I heard about the career, the more I realized it was something I might enjoy, especially the fact that you change jobs every two to three years and can do completely different assignments.

"I was hired by the State Department in 1987, and after about four months of initial training, I went to Ottawa, Canada, to our embassy. I worked a lot of time in the consular section, issuing visas and also assisting American citizens, but I also worked in the management section in the

embassy and in the political section for a while. In political, I helped follow and report on a Canadian federal election campaign (Brian Mulroney's second mandate). In management, I learned a lot about how the embassy works logistically. I also helped support two presidential visits to Canada. When our presidents travel, it involves a lot of people and organization with the embassy in the middle of it all.

"The way it's worked out is that I spent two years in Canada, two years in Adana, Turkey, three years in DC, two and a half years in Bogotá, Colombia, four years in DC, and now three years in Slovenia."

The turning point in Haas's career occurred, he told me, in 1990.

"I had been headed to do consular and management work at a three-American consulate, kind of a sleeper, it could be argued, in southern Turkey. I was literally on the way to Turkey, on a stop in Paris, when Saddam invaded Kuwait.

"With the invasion, life changed completely. Within two weeks of arriving in Adana, I was at the Iraqi/Turkish border doing political reporting and trying to figure out if any Americans were trying to escape across the border.

"We entered a period of buildup for the war. Incirlik Air Base is about eight miles from Adana, and most of our work was centered on the military side of things. About 5000 military members and their families were on the base. We worked closely with the Command. Things got dicey all over. We ended up with a bomb going off in our consulate parking lot one evening. CNN came, etc. No injuries, but damage to vehicles. My boss, the consul, had his life threatened by a terrorist group. His picture and the threat were in the newspaper, and he was pulled from the post. I moved onto the base during the actual Gulf War.

"After the war, you'll recall that the Kurds started to flee northern Iraq. They all came into our consular district, and the refugee operation called Provide Comfort began. This ultimately morphed into Operation Northern Watch, which guarded the skies of northern Iraq for years, up to our going in a couple years ago. That operation had General Shalikashvili at its helm at one point, then General Tony Zinni. Those names became very well known as time went on, you'll recall. Our deputy chief of mission in Ankara at the time was Marc Grossman. He returned later as

Grossman just retired, having served last for Secretary Powell as our undersecretary for political affairs, number three in the State Department.

"So, the 'sleeper post' turned wild, and I got the chance to work with people who were truly fantastic to deal with and learn from. *Voila*. It's largely about luck."

Of course, what Dean regards as "luck" is not what civilians often regard as "luck." Successful, or at least fruitful, foreign service careers involve what civilians would regard as unlucky situations.

"During my time in Turkey," Haas told me, "a group of Americans who were 'searching for Noah's ark' was kidnapped by a Turkish terrorist group, the PKK. I was sent out to talk to local government officials about the case. My colleagues and I took turns monitoring it from closer in to the likely kidnapping site in eastern Turkey. I don't recall how many days they were held. It was at least two weeks. In the end, we had pulled back some from the area, and then we got word they were being released.

"So, I flew back out to the area and was the first American they saw when they were let go. We flew them out of the area on Black Hawk helicopters, as I recall. That was a God-bless-America moment."

About the gunplay in Bogotá:

was robbed and shots were fired. We were locked down in the theater not knowing what was going on outside. But there had been a robbery and a murder. I called our security, and they dispatched to the mall to whisk away me and a group of other diplomats (including Canadians). So, that was a dramatic highlight of my time in Bogotá. Every day we were driven to work from our homes in semiarmored vans. It was part of our security precautions."

(And, later, as an aside, Haas said, "I get most nostalgic for Bogotá. Colombia is a tragic country because it has such incredible potential [natural resources] and people but has been torn apart by inner strife for so long that it is hard to imagine it ever becoming what it could be. But I loved the Colombians who worked for and with me and found the country truly incredibly beautiful, or at least that part I was allowed to visit. I have a deep love for the people and place and would return to work there again without a doubt.")

Haas told me that after he ends his tour in Slovenia this summer, "I will return to Washington to be the director of the entry-level division of the office of career development and assignments in our Bureau of Human Resources. A mouthful. What it means is that I will oversee a staff of about 20. We'll all work with our new hires into the Foreign Service. We'll assign them to jobs, guide their early careers, and help resolve issues they might have during their probationary period. So, it's a huge mentoring responsibility and something I've hoped to do for some time."

At the very end of the time Haas and I spent typing at each other, I asked what things he kept in his Ljubljana apart-




ing on my bed - while I was still in it! I wanted to scream at him, but I forced myself to smile and say, "Good morning, Hayden, may I jump with you?"

BODY MEMOS

My right ear has been mutilated by my own hand. Once, it had three holes in it, starting at the lower end of my lobe and working up in succession. The first came by way of a piercing gun in a mall; the second two by way of ice, a sewing needle, and some adolescent courage. The first hole is still in use, albeit rarely, due to my life as mother and caretaker of small children. The second has closed from lack of use, and the third has torn out and become a split, disrupting the uniform curvature of my upper lobe.

This is partly because of the poor piercing and the use and abuse of weighty, gaudy '80s earrings. These markings took place during my adolescent rebellion in eighth grade at an upperclass-to-wealthy Catholic grade school quavering in its orthodoxy. The nuns were gone, but the lay teachers would still look askance at an ear with more than one earring. Adorning oneself in such a way harkened back to our pagan beginnings; at the very least, it was countercultural.

Reflecting back, I wish I hadn't done it. We were silly girls, up late, blowing off homework,

desperate to grab onto some meaning. The only thing I garnered was numbress — literal and figurative — and a scarred earlobe. Now, 15 years later, with an explosion of body piercing on the youth-culture scene — a culture far more edgy than it was in my day - I wonder what their reasons are.

Jeffrey Fagan, also known as Dr. Jefe, owns two body-piercing shops in San Diego, one in Ocean Beach and one in North Park/University Heights. He offers me some answers. "There are a lot of reasons why people get pierced. You have your younger crowd, who are doing it as

a rebellious type of thing or because it's cool; you have your people who like to wear jewelry and adorn their bodies; and to many people, getting a piercing is something that can be spiritual or really meaningful. A lot of times, I hear, 'I've been wanting to do it for years. I finally just worked up my nerve to get it done.' Or, 'I broke up with my boyfriend,

he never wanted me to do it, and now I'm gonna do it.' Or, 'It's my birthday. I'm turning 40 years old and marking it."

Fagan tells me that when he got divorced, he got a piercing; he says his piercings give him strength."When I'm having a problem with myself,



and lots in my ears. I got my tongue pierced when I was 26; it was an impulse thing. A friend of mine had it done, and it looked cute. You can get really pretty jewelry for your piercings." Fagan points out her tongue jewelry: "It's small; it's really pretty and feminine." Marie continues, "I could look hard if I wanted to. I could have gotten my lip or my eyebrow done. My best friend has a lot of those, with really big jewelry. That's just her thing." Comments Fagan, "Some people do, like, a nice, tiny little nose ring, or a little charm with a stone --- something soft, something gentle. But some people like getting big thick hoops in their nose and their lips and their ears and their eyebrows. And if that's going to build your self-esteem or make you feel better about yourself, okay, then, let it be."

I've noticed several of Fagan's television and newspaper ads. He agrees with my suggestion that he is mainstreaming body piercing. "I like to think that I'm getting a lot of different people to look at piercings and understand. I can't tell you how many times somebody comes in here in a business suit, male or female, and asks a couple of questions.

"The average age of piercees around here [the O.B. store] is about 26, but we do get a lot of people in their 30s and 40s, teenagers and college kids. If you're in a sorority and one of the bigwigs in the sorority has her navel done, you can bet your bottom dollar that every other girl in that sorority is going to get her navel done too. We get a lot of people in the Navy SEALs, and they get two piercings done: their tongue and their penis. It marks them when they're together; they're bonded."

Fagan has experience piercing a wide selection of the populace, but not everybody is game in the free market. "We don't pierce minorsanybody under 18 - unless they're with a parent, and even then, we will only go down to 16. At that age, we will only do navel or facial piercings. We won't do any kind of genital piercing or nipple piercing, because there are still growth patterns left. Younger

kids aren't quite as responsible, and those kinds of piercings can be problematic in their healing if they're not taken care of properly. It also can be considered sexual assault."

Fagan got into piercing in part through a longtime interest in the workings of the human body. "When I was a kid, I was such a roughhouser, and I got hurt a lot. I was in the hospital so many times, getting stitches or casts, and I always paid attention to what was happening to me. I was really intrigued by it. In fact, I wanted to go to med school but later decided I wanted to travel and have a little freer lifestyle."

Fagan spent those freer years backpacking through Asia, Europe, Central America, and Northern Africa. His interest in medicine got him branded "the Medic" among his traveling companions. He'd stitch them up or give them temporary settings when they were injured. "Because I played the medic part, a lot of my friends that were interested in getting pierced trusted me with their bodies. So I

started learning about piercing, reading different magazines, looking up Gray's Anatomy, Clemente's Anatomy, learning a little more about the body. I even went to a school out of Sacramento, the Michael Hare Exotic Body Piercing School. It was a good school for learning, very basic.

"I started doing piercings out of my house for about a year and a half before I opened up my store. People at parties and clubs were telling me there was a market for it, so I sold a motorcycle, maxed out my American Express card, took a cash advance on my Visa, and maxed out another card, because I believed the idea was going to work. When we first opened, we did only basic piercings. We wouldn't do any genital piercing-I didn't have the proper training. It's very important to understand the anatomy, especially in the genital area. I mean, ruining somebody for life is a possibility if you have no clue what you're doing."

Fagan tells me all of his piercers have a minimum six years' piercing experience and a thorough knowledge of sterilization techniques. Every day the piercing tools are soaked in an ultrasonic cleaner filled with maidacide, a hospital disinfectant, for ten minutes. This kills any bacteria. Then they are hand-washed, rinsed, and packaged in sterile bags. The tools and any jewelry that will be used are put into an autoclave, a sterilization machine, and cooked at 275 degrees for 15 minutes to get rid of any residual bacteria. Fagan adds, "We buy brandnew needles all the time. We never reuse a needle. Dropping a needle in a bottle of alcohol is not going to kill the hepatitis or the HIV. Hepatitis can live on the surface of something for up to two weeks. Alcohol is not going to clean it off; that's why you need the autoclave." All the jewelry used in initial piercings is made from surgical steel.

The emphasis on body awareness and health is reassuring, especially to a mother, but I wonder if such cleanedup rebellion is really rebellion. "Sure," answers Fagan.







"These are smart people. They're rebelling, and they're doing it the right way. I mean, they could very easily do it at home, do it the wrong way, do it dirty, get an infection. I decided to open up an establishment where people can do the things they want to do in a safe environment, so I'm not hurting people, and they're not hurting themselves."

Fagan says the most common pierces are done in the tongue, the nose, and the navel. "Ninety-five percent of navel piercings are obtained by women, because it's a cute pierce. And you can always get great jewelry for it --- something subtle, just to look sexy. But it's important to suit the piercing to the person, whether it's the size of the ball or the type of stone. In navel piercing, some girls might like large balls because they're a bigger girl, and they want it to be seen. Very dainty girls like something a little smaller.

"It's also important to get the right kind of jewelry for the pierce in there. Curved barbells tend to be the easiest piercing to get, because 90 percent of that jewelry is inside of your body. But with a hoop or a circular barbell, only about one-third of that jewelry is in your body. The other twothirds is out there to be hit by all the elements - like your jeans, shirt, or just the air ---and collect bacteria. Your body is secreting fluids from the pierced area that harden and form a scab, and these fluids also harden onto the jewelry. When jewelry, like a hoop, rotates freely, the dried plasma, or the crusties that have formed onto the jewelry, go into your piercing and scratch it." And once it gets scratched, it can get infected. The danger lessens with time, as the skin forms a protective epidermal tracka skin tube - around the jewelry, just as it would around an ear piercing.

"Getting a tight stud in there might also be a problem, because when you're cleaning it, you're not able to extract it and move it around. When you have a barbell, you can slide it up and down. You're able to clean the upper 50 percent, push it down through the skin, extract the other 50 percent, and clean that. Some people may need

longer, curved barbells, like a half-inch, while others only need three-eighths."

But not everyone seeking navel adornment leaves with it. "We turn people away all the time. Some women come in and want their navel done. If they're too heavyset, they might have thicker skin or less of a lip, and the way the stomach will fold or sit may create a problem for the piercing to breathe, causing a kind of stagnation. Then it won't heal properly. Or, if they're too skinny, and they have a flat stomach with no lip on their navel, the body might reject the piercing and push it out.

"There's a lot of things [said] about navel piercing, like, 'Oh, they get infected all the time. They're problematic.' Well, they can be, if somebody is pierced who shouldn't be. The old school was: you pierce deep. But if you pierce deep, it takes a long time to heal. There's a fine line between too deep and not deep enough. When it's not deep enough, the surface layers over the jewelry can actually lose the circulation of blood and turn

into a scab — the jewelry will fall out. But when it's deep...the more meat you go through, the longer it takes to heal. It's like a steak cooking. The thinner the steak, the quicker it will cook; the thicker it is, the longer it will take."

I wonder also about the pain. Piercing all those sensitive body parts seems like it could be torturous. "Piercings are not very painful," Fagan assures me. "They don't even take one second to get, for the most part. You feel either a quick burn or a little

body rush, like getting a shot but without the liquid getting injected into you, which is what really hurts." Marie adds, "I think it's the apprehension before you go in that's the hardest. You're thinking, 'Oh, my God, I wonder if this is going to hurt.' But it's so quick..."

Mark, a client of Fagan's who has piercings in his tongue, ears, nipples, and penis, jumps in. "It's really quick, really efficient. It's not like they're grinding or drilling it into you. My first genital pierce was through the foreskin. That hurt quite a bit; it was probably the worst of all the piercings, but it was a brief pain. My nipple piercings were a little sore. I didn't sleep too well that night, because I rolled over on them."

Fagan goes up and down the pain scale for me. "The most painful pierces are through the cartilage in your upper ear, because cartilage is basically one stage down from bone. But the tongue is absolutely minimal pain; it's nothing to get it done. It's a very simple piercing. What

we do is go through what's called the median of the lingua, the center of the tongue, which is pretty much lacking everything like arteries and such. But what will happen is, 24 to 48 hours later, you will start to receive some swelling and soreness. That's why we start people out with a longer barbell, so it will accommodate your swelling.

"One of the things we tell people is, when your pierce is healed, come in and get a shorter barbell, because when it's long, it flops around in the mouth. A person may play with it a lot and wear the enamel off his teeth, or it could cause gum deterioration. But if you shorten the barbell, you still have a piece of jewelry in there, and it will still be effective during oral sex for clitoral stimulation. Also, you reduce the risk of problems like slurred speech or others I mentioned."

The willingness to run a piece of metal through your tongue for the sake of greater stimulation reflects a deep devotion to the sensual world, a devotion exceeded perhaps only by those willing to pierce their most sensitive organs their genitalia. Fagan backs me up. "To be perfectly honest with you, it's for stimulation purposes."

Which is not to say that the barbell is a magic bead. "People ask, Will it really make me that much better in bed?' My answer to them is, 'No, it's probably just going to make them feel a little bit more.' If you don't know what you're doing now, it's not going to make you know what you're doing. 'When I get my tongue pierced, is it really that much more sensitive for my girlfriend when I'm having oral sex with her?' Well, of course, the ball is a much smaller object; it can really manipulate the clitoris better. But if you don't know what you're

doing anyway, it's not going to make a difference. Some people come in and they get things done because they think that it's going to make a difference: they have a short tongue, and their girlfriend wanted them to get it pierced because they thought it might work better. So they get it done for that particular reason only: 'I only got it done because my girlfriend wanted me to do it.' "

But then it might not help?

"It won't make it worse, but it might not solve their problems."

Besides enhancing more conventional practices, piercing can open new horizons. "I have a nipple piercing," says Fagan."I was always intrigued by the fact that women had such sensitivity in their nipples. Men do, too, but men just don't really know how to bring it out; it has a mental aspect. I was intrigued by the fact that when I would kiss a woman's breast, she would moan, enjoy it. When I found out that a male nipple piercing makes it more sensitive, I decided to feel what it was like. If a woman could enjoy it so much, then maybe I could,

too. It's about sensitizing your body so vou can feel better while you're touching yourself or making love with your partner." Further, "It's also a self-esteem booster. I've never met a gentleman who has a genital pierce who hasn't been more proud of it, showed it off, and had more confidence."

Along the confidence line, he explains to me how piercings can help women with inverted nipples."Women with inverted nipples are usually bothered by them, because it's a self-conscious thing. And

when a woman is in bed, and she's feeling uncomfortable about that particular thing, it may disenable her to climax.

"The problem with the inverted nipple is that the tendon that the nipple is attached to sometimes doesn't stretch enough in order for the nipple to come out, or it's underdeveloped. So we pierce it with a straight barbell in order to pull it out and stretch the tendon, so that it becomes relaxed. Since the barbell is straight, it can't be sucked in. We couldn't use a hoop, because it would


pleasure, and when a man knows he's doing a good job getting his woman off, he knows that she's going to reciprocate. Also, some piercings tickle when you're having intercourse. They could tickle the male — it could be a urethra tickle, depending on the piercing. It may tickle different parts of your partner. I don't want to say male or female, because not everybody is straight. Male genital piercings work on other males; it stimulates the prostate gland."

What exactly have these men had done to their penises? Fagan gives four examples, though more exist. "Well, there's the ampallang, which goes straight across the entire head of the penis, through the urethra. That can take a year to heal." From the pictures he shows me, the jewelry used for this pierce is usually a barbell. "Then there is the Prince Albert, which loops from the underside of the penis through the urethra, coming out the opening. Then you have a frenum, which is in the same area as a Prince Albert — the soft tissue right below the corona of the penis gland." Those latter two are the most common, "but you

Fagan tells me a frenum piercing might bring more inner wall stimulation to one's partner, while a ReSearch book on Modern Primitives that he shows me offers this about the Prince Albert: "The Prince Albert, called a 'dressing ring' by Victorian haberdashers, was originally used to firmly secure the male genitalia in either the left or right pant leg during that era's craze for extremely tight, crotch-binding trousers, thus minimizing the man's natural endowment. Legend has it that Prince Albert wore such a ring to retract his foreskin and thus keep his member sweetsmelling so as not to offend the Queen. Today its function is strictly erotic, providing the ultimate in sexual pleasure to men of both persuasions." Depending on the piercing, healing can take anywhere from three months to a year.

We move on to what the women use to adorn their pearly gates. "What women usually get done is a hood piercing. You're piercing the skin above the clitoris, not the clitoris itself. This causes direct stimulation to the clitoris; it takes two to four weeks to heal." Fagan emphasizes that he doesn't pierce the clitoris because "it has about 6000 nerves, and if you hit that thing, you're going to ruin it. It's going to die. That's why we won't do it. People do get it done, but I personally believe it's a risky piercing."

What else do the girls go for? "We do a labia minora or a labia majora piercing the inner and outer layers of skin. The inner labia is the softer, thinner tissue that leads to the vaginal orifice. This thinner tissue goes upward in a very thin line of skin that's going to surround the clitoris, called the frenula. That's where you do your hood piercing. The outer labia are mostly pierced for looks. I've even gotten requests for two piercings in the inner labia, so that when their men go overseas, they can put a little padlock on it."∎



Suppose Reality Exists

Great Books Discussion

ne way to discover reality is through science. Another way is through philosophy. Both are complementary to one another, not oppositional," says Thom Pham, cofounder of the San Diego Philosophy Reading Group. "We [approach philosophy from] a realist position, taking the presupposition that reality exists instead of doubting everything, like Descartes.'

On Monday, January 23, the San Diego Philosophy Reading Group will discuss its



latest biweekly reading assignment, Aristotle's Posterior Analytics, Book 1b. "This philosophy discussion group is

very similar to the Great Books Foundation discussion group," says Pham. "They choose their [reading] selections once a year and have a full calendar, and we choose every six months. We focus more specifically on philosophy, whereas Great Books Foundation focuses more on literature, fictional, short stories, and stuff like that." Pham belongs to both discussion groups.

"Mortimer J. Adler, a realist, started the Great Books Foundation reading-discussion groups all over the United States in 1947, so we're latecomers in a sense." According to greatbooks.org, the foundation is "a nonprofit educational organization whose mission is to promote reading and discussion of outstanding literature by people of all ages.3

In regard to spirituality and its role in philosophy, Pham says, "We reject Platonic idealism, the idea that this world is not that real because there is something beyond us that is more real — that's Plato. In this group we've carved out a niche for our reading selection and have limited certain

selections as being beyond our presupposition. We use the word 'spirituality' in a naturalistic sense, meaning that spirituality refers to our conscious mind and our conscious mind is real, we each have one, and we can think about our lives, our friendship, and love as spiritual things, but all in a natural realm." Pham is an atheist, but he says the group never speaks of religion as each person (of approximately five regulars) "comes from a different walk of life."

The 17-page selection from Posterior Analytics, translated by G.R.G. Mure, involves work reminiscent of the general education course Logic 101. "Logic is a method for discovering knowledge," says Pham. "If you need to know anything in the universe, logic is the first tool that anyone who wants to discover the world has to master. Then you can talk about physics, metaphysics, or any branch of science or history.

"The connection between logic and philosophy is that it is philosophy, in a way, that defines method. You chisel your logical hammer to become suitable only for that view [you have]." Before the holidays, the group read work by Henry Veatch, who had 'made the contention that modern logic has taken the transcendental turn and that anyone who [follows] this modern logic is bound up into the notion that we cannot discover knowledge from an empirical standpoint. Most modern logicians, according to Veatch, are almost Platonists and Kantians. So, if Veatch is correct, and we're partaking the presupposition that he is, then we should go back to an older form of logic and study the method. Before Christmas we read a 20th-century text on logic, and now we're reading a 4th-century B.C. logic text."

Two types of questions - interpretative and evaluative — are posed for each



reading selection. The questions for interpretive discussion are sent to the group in advance. In this case, there were 27 (some of which have up to 6 sub questions) emailed to group members by cofounder Rich Franklin. Among them: "How does Aristotle resolve the dilemma about how demonstration could produce new knowledge?" and "If epagoge yields intuitive or undemonstrable knowledge, how can it also be a form of dialectical reasoning?'

The group will spend the first portion of its discussion interpreting the text. This, as Pham explains, raises questions like, "What does this word, sentence, or passage mean, in your opinion? We try to help each other come to a common understanding."

After approximately two hours of interpretation, evaluative comments are allowed into the discussion. "This is where the fun beings," says Pham. "One of the chief lessons we learned from Adler is that before you can criticize anything, you need to understand it. [During evaluative questioning] a person can say, 'Now that I understand this, I don't like this idea. Let me give you the reason why.

Though disagreements and the resultant debates do occur, logic dictates that everyone must agree in the end, because, according to the group's presupposition, there is only one logical truth. "When we express an opinion, we're claming an exclusionary truth. So when we debate it and someone has a stronger argument, we have to back down our opinion because in logical truth, if one is true, the others are false, says Pham.

Pham insists that even philosophers know how to have fun. "I just injured my back because I was snowboarding. I like road trips and that kind of stuff," he says. In Pham's opinion, philosophy is "in the air," something that has been "predigested" for most people to "absorb through osmosis." Philosophy, according to Pham, contains three parts: "Your view of the universe, which is metaphysics; your view of yourself, which is ethics; and your view of the relationship between the universe and yourself, which is epistemology, or the study of knowledge.'



and Canis Minor are best seen during the early-evening hours of late January. By February 1, the waxing crescent moon's increasingly bright glare will begin to diminish the impact of the starry scene, and that interference will worsen as the moon progresses toward full phase on February 12.

The bright winter constellations happen to include about onethird of the most luminous stars appearing in the night sky. The brightest star of all, Sirius, lies in the constellation of Canis Major. Sirius appears as a scintillating, bluish point of light high over the southeast or south horizon during winter early-evening hours. The second-brightest star of the night sky, Canopus, can be seen hovering very low over the south horizon whenever Sirius is nearing its highest altitude (about 40 degrees) in the southern sky. In late January, this happens around 10 p.m.

Venus emerges from the morning twilight glare around Friday, January 20, and assumes an increasingly prominent position as a brilliant "morning star" in the eastern sky over the next several

weeks. Venus will remain a morning star until October, when it will pass behind the sun and thereafter reappear as an "evening star" again (as it was during most of 2005) in the west after sunset.

A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND I BY JERRY SCHAD

limbing high into the chaparraled, boulder-frosted hills at the east end of San Pasqual Valley, the San Dieguito River Park's San Pasqual/Clevenger Canyon trail system offers a variety of challenges for weekend hiking warriors. In the early 1990s the trails here were rather hastily carved out of a patchwork of public lands that had recently been incorporated into the emerging San Dieguito River Park. Since then, the rapid regrowth of vegetation following wildfires has obliterated some of the outermost trails, especially in the north

> section of the trail system. which is profiled here.


You'll find the trailhead on the north side of Highway 78 at 5.6 miles east of the Wild Animal Park and 2.6 miles east of Bandy Canyon Road. When headed east on 78, the turnoff comes unexpectedly; it is 0.3 mile beyond the parking lot for the south trail system.

The initial 0.3-mile stretch of trail slanting down to the oak- and sycamore-shaded bank of Santa Ysabel Creek is easy enough. Fording the creek to get to the other side, though, could be problematical or downright dangerous. That depends solely on the water flow, which is normally indolent, but occasionally (in a wet year) powerful.

Near the summit, on San Pascual north trai Beyond the Santa Ysabel Creek crossing, the narrowing trail ascends in a zigzag pattern up the hillside, and the view west toward San Pasqual Valley and the coast gets ever better and ever wider. You come to a trail junction about 2.5 miles from the creek crossing, about 1300 feet higher in elevation. At the trail fork there, decide where you want to go: right toward any of three viewpoints, or left toward any of six viewpoints. You aren't likely to get very far in any short period of time by either route, since most of this upper part of the trail system has been sorely neglected in the past decade. Emergent chaparral vege-

Timothy Egan, born in Seattle in 1954 and raised, primarily, in Spokane, is a national enterprise reporter for the *New York Times*. He is the author of four books and the recipient of several awards, including the Pulitzer Prize. He lives in Seattle with his wife and children.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR:

Tim Egan, from his home in Seattle, said that his parents had nine children and little money. They moved the family across the state, to Spokane, when Egan still was relatively young.

In a New York Times article, Mr. Egan wrote: "At age seven, I walked into first grade at Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary elementary school in Spokane and was confronted by an enormous poster depicting the fall of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. 

He also began work. "I got my degree in 1980. What happened was, I took a job [on the staff of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer before I got my degree, so I had to go back and get it a few years later." In 1989, he joined the New York Times.

Mr. Egan is concerned that readers will not care about the Dust Bowl days. "It seems so long ago to so many people. One point I tried to make fairly high up in the book, in the introduction, is that those people who lived through that, at least some of them are with us now, and this is their story. It happened in their lifetime. It didn't happen in long ago, far

awav. "These people lived through the most dramatic technological innovations in the Great Plains. Those innovations did change the Great Plains overnight. Without those changes you still would have had relatively small family farms, people working the land within the scale of what they could sustain. But with tractors you brought industrial might to what was a family agrarian situation. And then you throw in the wild volatility of wheat prices, which have never done any swing since today the price of wheat is almost below what it was 80 years ago.





Clear Violation? Local country radio station U.S. 95.7 has a blue-and-red shield logo that resembles an interstate freeway sign. That's a problem.

"The actual route shield is trademarked by a group called the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials," says Caltrans attorney Jeffrey Joseph. "The reason I know this is because there was a strip club in Riverside called Club 215. They were using the 215 route shield. [The association] wrote them a letter and said, 'Cease and desist because you're using

our trademark.' "

According to the state Outdoor Advertising Act, Clear Channel-owned 95.7 was in violation two years ago when its billboards displayed the shield logo near freeways. The billboards, along



Interstate 8 in Mission Valley and the University Avenue exit off the 163, promoted morning DJs Tony and Kris. The station painted over the emblem.

A spokesman for the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, Shane Artim, says he wasn't aware that 95.7 was using the route shield as its logo. Artim points out that

the Washington, D.C.-based association, which represents the highway and transportation departments from all 50 states, allows for use of the logo when compensated.

"For example," says Artim, "the shield logo is going to be used in a Pixar movie coming out in the summer.'

Caltrans' Joseph isn't so much concerned about possible trademark violation; Caltrans' only interest is that commercial signs don't confuse drivers.

"If they're not next to the freeway, it's not going to create any motorist confusion problem," says Joseph. "At this point, I would tell you it's between U.S. 95.7 and the [association].

Current billboard promotions for 95.7 prominently feature the shield logo, but they aren't located next to freeways or on-ramps.

their playlist and that I didn't get permission. They also said it was too hillbilly.... [On Sirius], I play George Jones, Steve Earle, the Derailers, Son Volt, Waylon Jennings, and the Beat Farmers. Nixon and his partner Skid Roper opened a number of '80s shows for the Beat Farmers before Country Dick Montana died onstage in 1995.

Besides his Outlaw Country channel DJ program, Nixon has a talk show he launched on Sirius channel 103 six months ago. Since Howard Stern signed on with the satellite network, annual subscriptions have surged from 700,000 to 3.3 million. Yet, the satellite channel is losing millions of dollars.

"If [the Sirius job] works out, great," says Nixon. "I still make money off that song ["Elvis Is Everywhere"]. It just got played on German TV. I got \$8000. They played a minute of it on TV." — Ken Leighton

And on a personal note to the San Diego FCC, we roll much deeper than you. Take our shit again, and we'll only clown you even harder when we come back."


Free Radio's landlord, contacted by phone, says he's unconcerned about any FCC violations.

"I think they pay around \$500 a month," says the landlord. "It's a legal rental.... I don't believe they're breaking any laws, and I know I'm not." If the station is shut down again, besides having their new antenna dismantled, operators could be fined between \$1000 and \$150,000. "Our name was still on the marquee when we got there," says Hummel. "We did the same show last year at 4th&B and drew 700.... I had a funny feeling when I first booked it four months ago. Last year they had this really good advertising person named Hester [Hamman]. She did a real good job, but they replaced her." Why were ticket sales so

sluggish? "It was too close after

New Year's," says Niforshan. "It was in the middle of the week. I couldn't give those tickets away, literally. To fill the house we would have to do it with a bunch of homeless people. It would have been embarrassing for [the musicians] to take the stage. It was better to lose money and save face for the artist."

The musicians were paid. "We got two-thirds of the money of our guarantee," says Hummel. "I reminded the owner that we were way past the 40-day cut-off where they can cancel the show and just give us 50 percent of the guarantee and that we could sue. He said, 'Are you threatening me?' I told him I was just telling him of our legal option." Hummel says he hopes to return to San Diego with a blues-harp fest in October.

f you like the beat writing of Kerouac or spoken-word essays by the likes of Henry Rollins and Eric Bogosian, then Adam Gnade may be your cup of tea. If you're accustomed to innocuous pop music, then Gnade's stream-of-

consciousness rants (set to a slight musical backdrop by drop-in players) may be off-putting, filled as they are with rotting bodies, anxiety attacks, and stories of helpless

souls on hopeless quests (often involving drugs). "Sometimes I think people hate passion," he says. "Or are afraid of it." 



There are two problems with the so-called freak-folk scene. Well, make that three. The first is that the musicians look like hippies, and I don't trust hippies. Second, it's hard to tell what's folk about **Devendra Banhart**, Joanna Newsom, Coco Rosie, and many of the other related artists who have been the toast of the music press for the past year or so. Their music shows only the loosest relationship to folk tradition — it's usually performed in rock clubs and it sometimes uses electric instruments.

That brings us to problem No. 3: Most of these artists sing like cartoon characters

who have just discovered the Syd Barrett songbook. There may be great things to be found in their music, but first you have to get around the vocal affectation. That and the creepy lyrics about little boys. Am I up to four?

An exception is the Bay Area's **Vetiver**. Make that a partial exception: Banhart joined the band in 2003 and brings his crazylady-in-the-attic mannerisms to the backup vocals. But chief singer **Andy Cabic's** voice is clear and honest and his lyrics straightforward. While Vetiver's use

of drums and cello might have elicited cries of "Judas!" from folk purists back in the day, Cabic's songs always sound, to me at least, as if they have deep roots. Even when the band uses a cheap drum machine, as it does on "Busted (Brokedown Version)," the vocals


"With a few bucks in our pockets," writes singer-songwriter-guitarist Rodney Crowell in his autobiography, "we arrived in Nashville on an August night in 1972." How many times have you heard a story start out like that? But cliché or not, in Rodney Crowell's case it's true. He fell in with emerging talents like Townes Van Zandt and Guy Clark, peddled his tunes on music row, and eventually sold a few to Emmylou Harris. She drafted Crowell into her Hot Band and moved to L.A.

This was in the mid-'70s, just ahead of Nashville's implosion into formulaic slop. Good timing. In the decades following, country music became little more than a dispatch of red-state sentiments to the rest of humanity, music as empty-headed and grandiose as the hair-sprayed televangelists who rose from the bedrock communities of the Bible Belt. Emotions were for sale, something to be manipulated right down to the last teardrop.

Still, Crowell remained a member in good standing of country's solid-gold elite. He married into Nashville's first family when he hitched with Roseanne Cash. He produced some of her best records and eventually produced or wrote songs for everyone from Waylon Jennings to Keith Urban. It's when Crowell per-

forms his own work that the Nashville sheen comes off and the truer emotions

begin to reveal themselves through layers of smoky garage rock. Last year's album The Outsider was one of country music's brightest moments. It is a work of ingenuous clarity and alacrity, parsimonious, at times enraged. The Outsider works on me in the same way that past poet laureate Robert Pinsky once described a book of photographs: "They peel away my automatic responses and invite me to look again.'



This album completes a trifecta begun in 2001 with the release of The Houston Kid and 2003's Fate's Right Hand. Rodney Crowell is the outsider, and as such he lends hope that intelligence in country music is not an oxymoron.




















Ajax Argues For Tragedy

"Sophocles came to a beautiful end and lived to see no evil day."

Bessed is Sophocles," wrote the poet Phrynichus in 405 BCE, "a happy and fortunate man, who died after a long life; author of many beautiful tragedies, he came to a beautiful end and lived to see no evil day." Talk about your pristine

living!

Another legend, however, claimed that throughout his 91 "beautiful" years the Greek trage-

dian lived as if his life could shatter in an instant. Evidence comes from his plays. Many of his protagonists — Oedipus, Antigone, Ajax — have their world pulled out from under them.

Shakespeare calls him "blockish"; Homer, a "stubborn donkey." Nevertheless, during the Trojan War, the giant Ajax was renowned for his prowess in battle, second only to Achilles among the Greeks. When Achilles dies, both Ajax and wily Odysseus covet his god-forged armor. Favoring brains over brawn, the Greek leaders give the trophy to Odysseus. Ajax explodes. In a heartbeat, he falls from grace.

He vows to slay the Greek leaders. But the goddess Athena clouds his mind. Thinking he's murdering Agamemnon, Menelaus, and Odysseus, Ajax butchers a herd of stolen cattle and the men tending them. Sophocles' tragedy, Ajax, begins after the slaughter.

"Death changes life into destiny," wrote Andre Malraux. "One day makes or breaks a man," Marianne McDonald's lively new translation of Ajax observes. Ajax plummets from zenith to nadir, then falls on his sword. In a fit of anger (and in defiance of the gods), Menelaus denies him burial. But, Sophocles asks, how should Ajax be remembered: for one act of madness or a life of valiant deeds?

Ajax is the earliest of Sophocles's plays that survived. You can detect the seeds of Antigone (who obeys the "higher laws" of burial) and the Oedipus cycle in the text. But Sophocles also does something else. Anyone reading the Iliad for the first time — and if you haven't, make it this year's project; Fagles's translation - will be struck im-

mediately by how crabby, childish, and unheroic the Greeks are: Achilles mopes in his tent, Agamemnon and Menelaus are spoiled jerks; when a "common man" protests, Odysseus beats him up, and Ajax comes off as a big baby. The

Greek leaders hate each other much more than they do Trojans. In Ajax, Sophocles attempts a kind of old-school restoration.

JEFF SMITH Famous for writing about people not as they are but "should be," Sophocles looks past Ajax's foibles, which may have been Athenainspired, and stresses his nobler achievements.

Marianne McDonald's translation combines crisp dialogue and contemporary relevance (the Iliad is ever-so, especially the Greeks using Helen — a weapon of mass beauty? — as a pretext for going to war). Running through her text is a question: along with being a hero, does Ajax qualify as a tragic figure? Ajax argues against, and ultimately for, its inclusion into the genre.

In McDonald's hands, the play's many existential questions don't feel like didactic chin-stroking. But owing to stiff, strident performances at 6th@Penn, they don't come off as all that human either. With few exceptions, and when they aren't just shouting, the cast gives wooden deliveries. Instead of reaching tragic stature — which Laurence Brown's Ajax hints at but, owing to quirky, sometimes indecipherable readings, never reaches - they end up mere costume-pageant declamation.

Exceptions highlight the rule: Fred Harlow's forceful Agamemnon, Patricia Elmore Costa's fierce, slimy Menelaus, and Brandon Walker's angry Teucer (who speaks for the "common man" absent, save for Thersites, in Homer) each brings life to a production sorely in need of a lift.

The technical elements solve more problems in staging the Greeks than the cast. Amanda Stephen's black and gold set suggests the Trojan plain and provides a boulder to conceal the selfslain Ajax for the play's last third. Another problem: how do you represent a Greek god live?

Since they often took human form, the only way to recognize them was their immortal eves. Paul Savage slideprojects Athena's onto the tent: wide, irate orbs make the goddess of wisdom look equally capable of madness.

Sophocles wrote that Fortune's Wheel could ruin a life in an instant. Jessica Blank and Erik Jensen's docudrama offers contemporary examples. Taken from court transcripts, interviews, and case files, The Exonerated follows the fates of six Death Row inmates wrongly convicted of capital crimes.

Witnesses said the African-American perps were under six feet, and he was six-two. Nonetheless, a Florida court sentenced David Keaton to death for murdering a police officer. "A pravin' man," Keaton sustained hope, even though his cell stood just doors away from the electric chair. Eight years later, he was released. But even then the authorities "still didn't want to admit they were wrong."

Each of the six subjects in Exonerated was set free after facing death. But just how free is that? Keaton, who couldn't watch a prison movie without feeling locked inside it, never returned to "normal." Neither did Kerry Max Cook, incarcerated for 22 years. Her reprieve haunted Sunny Jacobs, a self-styled hippie whose life plunged from justice for all to something out of Kafka.

Though one could wish it spent more time on the re-entry shock of dead men suddenly walking free the Lazarus Effect — and that it went deeper into fewer victims, Exonerated is an important docudrama. In the hands of Lynx Performance Theatre it's often quite moving.

Like The Vagina Monologues and The Guys, the play's become a national event, performed by stars (Susan Sarandon, Charles Dutton, Richard Dreyfuss) and even by some of the actual people. It's done, script in hand,

as a staged reading. Lynx director Al Germani and a strong ensemble cast give it a full performance. This makes for stark immediacy. As does the production's reverse theater-in-the-round configuration. The audience faces the condemned, a





A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but San Diego Theatresports' "game show" is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, wrote one of the very best books I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art."

Too Old for the Chorus: But Not Too Old to Be a Star Every seven seconds, a Baby

Boomer becomes "officially old" by turning 50. Mark Winkler, Marie Cain, and Shelly Markham's musical revue bemoans, and eventually (and predictably) accepts this condition. In the finale, five perform-ers vow to find new "Potential" in their sixth decade of life. All five are polished pros: Steve Anthony does a spectacular tap number ("When 50 Wore Tux"); Teri Ralston adds emotional depth to songs with skimpy lyrics; Susan Jordan handles the comedic chores with ease (and does a sultry samba with Anthony); David Holmes and Brian Byers always contribute. Problem is: they're much better

than the material. Too Old has three or four catchy/moving numbers (especially "Lunch Hour Lift," about quickie plastic surgery; the Wordsworthian piece "The Child Is Father to the Man"; and Holmes' touching rendition of "Dog Passages," in which the singer marks the years by the dogs he's had). The rest, though always well done (and the cast snappily dressed by Jill K. Mesaros), are negligible. They hold down slots till better songs come along - of which Too Old could use at least six. The revue has a frame: the five performers are auditioning for a chorus, and, of course, for the next phase of their lives. To merit a callback, Too Old needs major reinventing. 


Triple Espresso: A Highly Caffeinated Comedy

Hugh Butternutt's done his lounge act at the Triple Espresso Coffeehouse 20 years to the day. While patrons sip a house blend — "Grape," "Scandinavian Blizzard," or "Mokoko Cocoa Mocha" -Hugh plays '70s tunes on the piano. He and his companions, here to celebrate Hugh's anniversary, got stuck in the '70s. The trio used to be Maxwell, Butternutt, and Bean, a comedy group that never went far. They're "losers," they ad-mit, but not "ordinary" ones. And, hey, their reunion could help them face searing issues from their mediocre pasts. A formulaic story line? Yep. Straight from Forever Plaid. There's also the Forever Plaid problem: the three comedians are far too talented to play inept characters. One's a whiz at the piano. Another's a first-rate mime, and the third's a crackerjack magician. The trio is so talented, when the plot has them complain of difficulties to overcome, you wish they'd quit trumping up the pseudodrama and get on with this highly entertaining, if lightweight show. (Note: the original cast members have been replaced.) Worth a try.

The Mandarin Mystique

The holiday deluge of relatives hit at gale force during the week after Christmas, bringing my partner's son Gary, his wife Tina, and their four children from the suburban outback northeast of L.A. This incursion presented a trinity of logistical problems: how to lodge, entertain, and feed them for a day. In preference to setting up tents on our front lawn, we put them up at a motel near City College and started the afternoon by turning the kids loose at the beach at the Hotel Del Coronado, followed by early-evening ice skating on the beach-side rink.

Dinner was a tougher decision: The kids range from 7 to 17 and have spent their lives in Palmdale and Lancaster - not exactly hubs of sophisticated cuisine. They're well-mannered, but I still wanted a place where nobody would be shocked at any possible "kid" behavior. They eat enough fast food in the normal course of life that burgers were out of the question. Plus, the oldest, Chris, has the beginnings of a palate, and little Sara has an adventurous spirit, so we were aiming for a big-city treat without dropping a lot of cash. Initially, I thought we'd eat at Miguel's Cocina, near the Del, but by day's end all four young'uns were dripping with ocean water overlaid with ice water and desperately needed a motel-stop to change into dry clothes.

Then I remembered the Panda Inn at the top of Horton Plaza. I decided it would serve to introduce my step-family to the ancient customs of my people: In New York, tribal gatherings ceremonially conclude with a Chinese feast served around a lazy Susan on a big, circular table. From thence comes the adage: "With six you get egg roll."

With eight at Panda Inn, you get spring rolls - and lots more. Instead of having to hammer out compromises over the ancestral "four from Column A, three from Column B," Panda offers three prix-fixe banquet menus ranging from \$20 to \$29 per person. The more sophisticated dishes that I'd normally choose (e.g., salt and pepper shrimp, sizzling-plate scallops and asparagus with black-bean sauce, meatball and Napa cabbage "Lion's Head" casserole) aren't offered on the banquets, but I didn't think the Palmdale contingent would want them anyway. Given the gang's diverse ages and tastes, I suggested that Gary choose one of the banquets. He picked the \$20 version because it included the highest percentage of suburb-familiar dishes. We soon found ourselves facing course after course of Mandarin treats calculated, as an assortment, to appeal to every taste, from the naïve to the worldly. Portions proved gigantic, so diners at our table could eat as much as they wanted of whichever dishes they liked best, and we still dog-

gie-bagged enough to feed the whole crowd a second time.

Our banquet began with a cauldron of won ton soup, with a hearty, salty chicken broth (so earthy that Gary took it for beef-barley broth)

afloat with crisp water chestnut disks, shrimp, roast pork, mushrooms, and ginger, and slightly gummy won ton skins filled with minced chicken. I'd have

preferred classic pork-shrimp won tons, truth be told, and thinner pasta skins. Little Sara loved it but wouldn't eat the shrimps; secondoldest Matthew was happy to liberate them from her bowl.

Next came a quartet of dips: Chinese mustard; thin, tangerine-colored sweet-sour sauce; a dark Hoisin or plum sauce (it tasted sweeter than classic Hoisin, but spicier than plum); and bright red chunky chili-garlic sauce. These accompanied three appetizers. Spring rolls, filled with cabbage, carrots, mushrooms, and sesame seeds, pleased us all: Sara, green eyes aglow, liked them so much, she peeled off the dough layer by layer, to enjoy the crisp pastry before she chomped into the filling. The dip that went best with the rolls was the sweet-sour sauce. Tiny baby-back pork ribs were delightful: Glazed with honey, Chinese five-spice blend (redolent of star anise), and sesame seeds, they were fall-apart tender, and everybody at the table loved them except long, lanky Tina, who'll eat no fat. (Gary and Tina reverse the

"Jack Sprat" rhyme.) Pork pot-stickers had very soft skins and a nondescript filling and were supposed to be served with a soy-sesame dip that never showed up. The chili-garlic table sauce saved them from terminal blandness.

Then the entrées started coming, and coming, and coming. My favorite was a combination of eggplant and tofu, a sexy textural mix of slick-

ness and sponginess, robed in a dark, piquant garlic sauce. The seasoning was complex — perhaps due to the fresh hot peppers and chili sesame oil. I found this the most purely "Chinese" dish we tasted. Chris, who is nearly vegetarian, also liked it a lot.

Mongolian beef with scallions was much spicier, appealing to the budding machismo of 14-year-old Matthew, as well as his dad. It featured red jalapeños, bamboo shoots, and garlic in a soy-based sauce thickened with cornstarch. Actually, all the males warmed to the spicy dish while the Palmdale gals barely touched it. I found it pleasant but ordinary.

Three of the banquet dishes of the Asian-for-Palmdalers mode were tasty for that genre, a reminder that once upon a time these were actual Chinese delicacies, not just grist for the sugar-craving gullets of the blue-eyed devils. I actually enjoyed the orange shrimp (which Panda Inn claims as its own invention), spicier and more complex than its gummy cousins at the 99-cent

steam-table joints. Nicole, a glamour girl of 12, went for seconds. In the sweet-sour pork, the pieces boasted crackly-crisp coatings from a dusting of dry cornstarch applied before they hit the deep-fry oil. With no hint of grease, this was a respect-worthy version of a dish I'd never order on my own. Even the cashew chicken with Asian chives, Tina's favorite, was relatively sophisticated, a reminder of why slightly upscale "Mandarin" restaurants seemed so exciting when they first began to supplant Cantonese-American joints in the late '60s. The thick, dark sauce was amended with sautéed bell peppers and water chestnut disks. There was little left by the end of the meal.

The climax of the banquet was tea-smoked duck, which arrived shredded, with the accouterments typically served with roasted Peking duck: shredded scallions, thin-sliced cucumber, and dainty steamed buns for making sandwiches. Disappointingly, the duck meat was dry, the skin flabby and fatty — the opposite of Peking duck so the bun treatment seemed inappropriate. Even the dipping sauce tasted too sweet, and the cucumbers were limp. These garnishes highlighted the duck's weaknesses, not its strengths. The pos-





itive side: The faint smokiness of Lapsang Souchong black tea was pleasantly exotic. Sara had never tasted duck before. Grandpa gave her a clean, skinless piece. She liked it enough to ask for seconds.

Last and least was kitchensink lo mein — thick, house-made Shanghai egg noodles (as fat around as udon) with bamboo shoots, mushrooms, nicely sautéed sliced beef, Chinese cabbage, and spinach in yet another soysauce gravy.

What I liked was that \$20 per person bought a huge and decent dinner. What I didn't like: Nearly all our entrées fell into two categories of sauce, either spiced-up sweet-sour or spiced-up cornstarch-thickened soy, both obscuring the natural flavors of the ingredients. This was a fault specifically of the banquet menu — as mentioned earlier, a number of à la carte dishes promise greater subtlety and lightness for diners unburdened by backwoods kinfolk or passels of young'uns.

The wine list is conventional and not especially suited to Asian cuisine: There are decent California Chardonnays and Sauvignon Blancs and various reds by the bottle or glass, but no Gewürtz, Riesling, or Vouvray - fruitier whites that get along well with spices. Given the choices, I went for a "fresh-fruit margarita," which tasted good and was weak enough to earn a PG-13 rating. Maybe the bartender was careful to keep Granny sober in front of the kiddies. The guys downed beers, and the kids drank raspberry lemonades and sodas.

Full to the brim, we passed on dessert (vanilla ice cream comes with the banquet) but got a kick out of the fortune cookies — they were streaked with a tasty vanilla glaze. That evening ended happily for me when the whole Palmdale contingent chorused that the food was good — "Way, way better than the Great Wall." I guess that's their local best Chinese! I've never eaten there, but yes, I'm sure Panda Inn is indeed way better.

THE MYTH OF MANDARIN CUISINE

Panda Inn specializes in the style known as "Mandarin cuisine," putatively the prerevolutionary royal dishes of Beijing's Forbidden City, centering on the cooking of northern China. There's a certain amount of confabulation in this description. First of all, the palace often favored Cantonese chefs from southern China, just as the Ottoman Turk moguls preferred Armenian chefs. (You conquer an area, then you hire its best cooks.) Dim sum, for example, was invented by Cantonese palace chefs for the "Empress of China," that fearsome Manchu dowager with the 20-inch fingernails. As for authentic northern Chinese cooking,

when's the last time you saw boiled millet on a restaurant menu?

Nonetheless, the style called Mandarin does highlight the food of the prosperous merchant and bureaucrat classes of the northern provinces, with more meat dishes (vegetables separate, as in the west), darker gravies with a higher percentage of soy sauce, and more hot pepper than Cantonese cuisine e.g., dishes like Mongolian beef. It also includes some deluxe palace dishes such as minced squab in lettuce cups and mushu pork. And, as with the food of any national capital (always a magnet for ambitious provincials), Mandarin cuisine includes favorite dishes from other regions, such as Shanghai's "Lion's Head" casserole and Szechwan's kung pao.

In the western hemisphere, before Mandarin cuisine arrived, pragmatic Cantonese immigrants dominated the Chinese restaurant business,

serving southern Chinese peasant cuisine adapted to New World ingredients and tastes. Northern Chinese food hit the big time in the 1960s, when the elegant Cecilia Chiang created a stir with the Mandarin in San Francisco's Ghirardelli Square. There may have been other restaurants serving this cuisine, but the Mandarin's precise, masterful cooking, upscale decor, and Chiang's charismatic persona made the genre chic. Soon, "Mandarin" cuisine was viewed as a high-class alternative to plebeian Chinese-American.

Mandarin restaurants awakened Americans to the world beyond chow mein and egg foo yong. But in cities with large Chinese populations, like New York, Vancouver, and San Francisco, their faddishness faded as new generations of chefs arrived from Szechwan, Hunan, Shanghai, and Hong Kong to open authentic, distinctly regional restaurants. In areas like San

Diego, with a chronic shortage of fresh Chinese immigrants, a Mandarin-Szechwan-Hunan-Shanghai hodgepodge became the dominant mode — like most of our upscale Italian food, a multiregional compendium of favorite dishes, universally offered on cookiecutter menus.

Some 30 years ago, Panda Inn was founded in Pasadena by owner Andrew Cherng and his father, master chef Ming-Tsai Cherng (probably an immigration agent's spelling of the more common Cheung). The restaurant, which grew to five locations in So-Cal, became one of the pioneers of the food fad that seized hold of this region and has never let go. Each location has its own head chef, with a few specialties of his own, but all epitomize the myth of Mandarin cuisine. Some 11,000 Panda Express fast-food spinoffs have institutionalized it. ■

kay. You're standing in this wild melon patch beside the railroad tracks. Sun's just starting to blast through gaps in the morning clouds. It streams across Highway 101 and onto the yellow-and-white frontage of the

Pannikin, the cawfee place up here in - what? Encinitas? Leucadia? Hmm. Decision time. Pan-

nikin coffee or free melons? Sigh. I love melons, but I'm addicted to those little Ethiopian beans. I risk life and limb to skedaddle across rush-hour 101, and phew! - skittle up the steps of this ancient (1888) Santa Fe depot.

Inside is, as Billy Crystal would say, mahvelous. All sorts of memorabilia, old plank floors, ghosts of passengers past shimmering by. Only thing is they don't seem to have heavy breakfast stuff going on.

I order a coffee anyway and take it outside to the bench facing 101. Brrr. Even with the sun, that breeze is biting. Doesn't seem to bother the well-weathered gent on the other end. He sits in shorts and reads his paper.

"Hi, Billy," say a dozen people as they come out. Everybody knows Billy, it seems.

So I ask him where I should eat. "About half a mile up the road," he says.

Ten minutes later, the sign heaves into view. "A Little Moore Coffee Shop." Inside's sea-greenand-white cinder bricks, paintings of Encinitas on the wall, two bluey-gray Formica counters that snake around the center. Bunches of people sit at the counter.



"Good morning," says this guy at the cash register.

"Good morning!" says this perky gal carrying a coffeepot.

"Morning," says this hefty feller. He's sitting next to the stool I plop onto. A large Celtic cross is tattooed onto

his right calf. Gal hands me a menu. Oh,

yes. Just what the doctor ordered — a brekky place. A dozen different omelets, from a cheese (\$5.50, with hash browns and toast), to shrimp and cheese

(\$8.50), to Polish sausage and cheese (\$7.25). They also have pancakes (\$6.50, with two eggs and bacon or sausage), egg dishes like Polish sausage and eggs (\$6.25), or hamburger patty and eggs (\$6.95), or even teriyaki beef and eggs (\$9.25). The cheapest item is two eggs any style for \$4.75.

The guy next to me is looking at the specials board. They've got something up there called the Billy, an omelet with ham, avocado, and cheese, plus home fries or hash browns (or cottage cheese or rice), \$7.95. The Cindy is two French toast with two eggs and spuds (\$5.75), and the Pablo's a plate of grilled veggies over rice with chicken or beef, also \$7.95.

The Billy," the guy says to the waitress. "The usual.

Think I detect an Irish lilt to his voice. "Who's Billy?" I ask.

The gal, Amerlyn, says he's a regular, "a local guy who suggested that omelet combo, so we named it after him."

Huh. I make myself a bet it's Billy down at the Pannikin who's being honored here.

Amerlyn brings my neighbor his Billy. Yo. It's big, with two slabs of hash browns, and toast. "I pretty much always have it," he says. "Coffee?" Amerlyn asks. It's \$1.40. I nod and she pours. "Decided on breakfast?"

"I'll have what he's having," I say, 'cause time's clicking on. Gotta catch the 9:17 Coaster south, and it's a half hour walk from here.

My neighbor's name is Declan Doyle. Is that a great Irish name or what? He was born in Chicago into a second-generation family. "Up there, the different ethnic groupings stick together," he says. "So the accent survives."

"Is this customer giving you trouble?" Amerlyn asks. She's kidding, of course. She's a spirited kid. Everybody likes her. "CD," which is what everybody calls the guy standing over at the cash register, says that Amerlyn started when she was 15, 4 years ago. But that's nothing. Turns out CD has been the owner for 22 years. "And I'm just a newcomer," he says. "This little place has been going for 50, 60 years."

Half an hour later, and I'm still yakkin', still chomping. So many ham chunks, so generous with the avocado. And the home fries crunch when you bite. I splot salsa plus Tabasco to up the omelet's whack factor.

Only moment of dissatisfaction comes when I see Amerlyn passing by with — oh, man. A waybig-looking plate of grilled veggies and chicken on a mountain of rice. The Pablo. Damn. Wish I'd chosen that.

Declan's talking about how he's lived all over the world. He's been to Ireland - of course plus places like Malaysia, Australia. He's a carpenter, a good one, too, by the look of the drawings he's working on. They're for cabinetry in some loaded Leucadian's mansion. Have hammer, will travel.

"So how did you end up here?"

"I was driving my old \$1400 Mercedes diesel around the Southwest of the country, when I landed in San Diego. Love at first sight. I canceled the rest of the trip, sold the car, bought a house (in Oceanside). I'm never going back to Chicago.

Oh, lord. Talked too long. Gotta catch that train.

"Don't worry. I can give you a lift," Declan declares.

He's not kidding. He has one of those maxoelevated Ford F-350 trucks you need to pole-vault to get into. We take off, passing over other vehicles, rather than around them. "I go to Little Moore a lot," he says, "because they're kind of fun, and they give you a big, honest breakfast."

He drops me off at the Coaster. But then I remember Billy and decide I'll just have to hoof it back to the Pannikin to ask if he's ever had an omelet named after him. 'Course, once I get there, he's gone. And now the Coaster clangs past. That means a three-hour bus ride back home. I can already hear Carla. "You missed a train for an omelet name? Are you out of your egg? Man, you crack me up." ■

Ramona Rising

"It's important to be able to name your dirt something."

s of January 6, there's a new American Viticultural Area in town: Ramona Valley. Before then, if you grew grapes outside of the San Pasqual or Temecula Valleys, the best you could do was South Coast - which

basically means, "Somewhere south of Santa Barbara." In a business where location counts as much as it does in real estate, that's not especially helpful. Foggy-soggy coastline, searing desert, mountain microclimate, balmy lowland — all South Coast. John Schwaesdall of Schwaes-

dall Winery - the one on the right as you drop down the hill and into Ramona proper thought his vineyard and the surrounding region deserved better. He even went so far as to contact the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms in '01 and start making inquiries. But inertia can set in when waiting on government agencies, and it wasn't until the Ramona Vinevard Association got wind of the idea that the project gained momentum. "I was talking to Johnny about it," says grower and Association member Bill Schweitzer, "and I thought it was a great idea." He and four other members formed a committee and wrote the government a formal request. Three years later, they got their final answer.

Why was it a great idea? First, because the numbers were there to make the effort worth-



while. Since founder Bill Jenkin gathered Ramona's growers into the Association three years ago, the planted acreage has jumped from 20 to 60. At least 20 growers are selling their grapes, "either to Ramona wineries or places like Witch

Creek, Menghini, or La Jolla Canyon." Victor Edwards recalls that when he and his wife Beth filed to get bonding for Edwards Vineyard and Winery, the local government "was caught off guard. They said, 'All of a sudden, there's a big upsurge in interest.' There are now nine bonded

wineries in Ramona, with more on the way.

Second, says Schweitzer, "because we're starting to grow some nice grapes here. Amateur winemakers have been winning medals at the San Diego County Fair with wines made from Ramona Valley grapes for years. We're seeing it with Schwaesdall's wines, with Edwards's," and with others. "Having an AVA doesn't give you quality, but it gives you the ability to make the connection between quality and the place where the grapes come from. If we're growing quality grapes, we ought to be able to say on our labels that they came from here — that's an advantage for grape growers. A winery's responsibility is to make good wine from the good grapes they get. If we can't give good grapes to them, they'll go elsewhere. They make their reputation with their label. Growers can only grow what their dirt will

create; it's important to be able to label your dirt as something."

Victor Edwards, besides offering bottled testimony with a tropicalfruity Chardonnay and a couple of intriguing red blends, shares this story: "I had always thought that Cabernet couldn't grow well south of Paso Robles. But then I got these grapes out of Rancho Santa Teresa. Phil Burton from Barrel Builders — that's a cooperage in Napa that builds and reconditions barrels — was down here, and I poured him some of this Cabernet. His comment was, 'When you bottle this, I want a few bottles. I'm going to have so much fun with this up north.' I took that as a compliment -

he's in Napa, and he thought that my Cabernet was at least worth playing with." (Edwards, who always intended to put Ramona Valley on his label, did the soil and climate workups for the AVA application.)

Third, because the valley really is its own place. "The nearest AVA is the San Pasqual Valley," says Schweitzer. "They're at 500 feet elevation; we're a thousand feet above that. They have alluvial soil; almost all of our stuff, even on the valley floors, is decomposed granite - very gravelly, with a lot of ability to absorb moisture and drive it down deep. The vines chase the water; it makes them work harder and go after more minerals.

But the biggest factor is the "onshore drift" the influence of cool, cloudy air borne in from the coast. San Pasqual, says Schweitzer, gets a lot more cloud cover. "We have some ocean influence, but it always goes away by midday." Often, "By 10 in the morning, we are in bright sunlight. We are going to get the maximum possible tem-

perature for that day. But then, certainly where I live on the west side of the valley, we get this breeze coming in at 4:30 in the afternoon that cools everything off. We have a huge diurnal shift, from 100 degrees in the middle of the day to 60 degrees in the evening. In San Pasqual, the hot part of the day is much shorter. And if you go three miles east of the Ramona Valley, you've got complete desert influence: if it's going to be hot, it's hot by six in the morning and stays hot until nine at night. We like our climate, because we get the influence of both ocean and desert."

Edwards is on the eastern edge of the valley, and he says, "Our AVA is right at the point where the onshore drift comes in, stops, and goes back. Sometimes, during the hot part of the season, we'll get it two or three times a year, sometimes five or six. I can see it in the mornings; it comes in, and within a half an hour you can see it turn around and go back out. But that's all you need to keep the temperatures just a little bit cooler." Why does onshore drift matter? When back





labels on bottles laud warm days and cool nights, they talk about how it gives the grapes a chance to "rest." Edwards and Schweitzer spell that out. If you get too much onshore drift, says Edwards, "especially as the grapes are ripening in late August and early September, the grapes just sit. They stall." But if you don't get enough onshore drift — if the sun has its way with your fruit all day long — then you may lose acid. "Your acid level is dropping as your sugars rise, and you're trying to keep it as high as possible," says Schweitzer. "A cool evening keeps the vine from pulling phosphates out of the ground and neutralizing the acids. If a grape — especially a red grape — is still keeping its acid while it's making good sugars, then you get better tannins in the skin, better color...things that contribute to quality grapes.'

In applying for an AVA, says Edwards's wife Beth, "you need to prove why you're different" from the surrounding area. The Association committee thought they had a case, and apparently they weren't the first to think so. Beth also notes that an early edition of Albert Winkler's *General Viticulture* lists Ramona's growing-degree days — a measure of available heat for vine development during the growing season somewhere between Livermore and Florence. The rough equiv-

alent, according to Schweitzer: St. Helena, an AVA situated in the not-disreputable winegrowing region of Napa, California. ■

NORTH COASTAL

Big Jim's Old South Barbecue 190 North Coast Highway 101 (two blocks north of Encinitas Boulevard), Encinitas, 760-635-1166. At this outstanding barbecue, you can "Put Some South in Yo' Mouth!" The smokingwood is mellow hickory, and each type of meat (sublime "pulled pork," smoky skewered shrimp, huge pork ribs, chicken, beef ribs, steak) gets individualized treatment, including a tangy Alabama-style mustard sauce for pork and chicken. (Beef gets the more familiar tomatoey Texas-style sauce.) You don't eat meat? The ever-expanding menu now includes a delicious spicy blackened grilled salmon steak. Side dishes are superb: Don't miss the thick, smoky-sweet Brunswick stew (you'll not find its like anywhere on this coast), exemplary hush puppies corn muffins with honey butter, wellbalanced slaw.... Oh, just taste every-thing you can fit under your belt. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Low moderate. — *N.W. (6/05)* **The Bird House Grill** 250 North Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-2882. A great place to check out real Turkish cuisine. The inside has a fine collection of blue-and-white wall plates and blue glass eyes to ward off evil spirits. Try the house specialty, Iskender Kebab (ground meat kebab, rice, tomato sauce, and house-grown yogurt) — "Iskender" means "Alexander." Or the Kofte plate (ground meat kebab, rice, salad, pita, and *tzatziki* sauce). The shepherd's salad is a traditional dish brimming with fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, onions, parsley, oil, and lemon. Good healthy Mediterranean diet. Even the baklavas are less gloopy. Open Monday to Saturday, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/04)

Calypso Cafe 576 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-632-8252. This "Calypso" has nothing to do with Caribbean music (or food), despite its tropical tiki-hut decor. The cuisine is French, ranging from old warhorses like onion soup and *coq au vin* to newfangled Gallo-Cal-Italian-Pacific Rim hyphenates such as *ahi pissaladière* (seared tuna pizza). The traditional dishes are generally the most successful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. Although there's nothing revolutionary coming from this kitchen, the cooking is generally agreeable. Dinner nightly, reservations advised. Upper moderate. — *N.W. (9/01)*

Knockout Pizza 2959 Carlsbad Boulevard, Carlsbad, 760-434-4468. It's New York pizza only here. "People back East are more traditional," says owner James, the ex-boxer, an old sparring buddy of the Bronx Pizza guys in Hillcrest. "We don't do California thick crust, we don't do pineapple, we don't do chicken. We don't do 'personal size,' either. But we *do* do slices." They make the pies with traditional thin, crips prusts and toppings like pepperoni, meatball, garlic, and "whitestone" (mozzarella, Parmesan, ricotta, garlic, and spinach). Maybe their best is the "Bronx Special," an assortment of pepperoni, sausage, onions, olives, mushrooms, pepper and garlic, said to fell New Yorkers quicker'n one of James's right uppercuts. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

Paul's Place 3671 Mission Avenue (at El Camino Real), Oceanside, 760-721-0124. This restaurant looks like a McDonald's or Wendy's (the building used to be a franchise) and the food comes fast, but it's no chain. The menu strikes a balance between American and Greek fare. The baked Greek half-chicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gyros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American three-egg breakfast specials with home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburgers, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkeyburger. Open seven days for all three meals. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

Teriyaki 101 250 North Coast Highway 101 (between Encinitas and Leucadia Blvds.), Encinitas, 760-632-8813. This surfer hangout has a secret: Be-hind a gate just south of the restaurant there's a sheltered outdoor dining patio decorated by a tropical mural of island life above and below the water. "Eat Healthy, Feel Good" is the motto on the menu, and teriyaki is the dish that dominates it. But this is Hawaiian teriyaki, with lighter, cleaner flavors than the Japanese version. The dark-meat "Maui chicken" skewer and the moist ono (pink snapper) kebab are es-pecially succulent; you can also opt for pork, veggies, numerous combos, and charbroiled burgers (of beef, fowl, or veggies). Everything comes with rice (white or brown), pleasingly touched with teriyaki sauce. Open Tuesday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. — N.W. (10/01)

Tip Top Meats 6118 Paseo Del Norte, Carlsbad, 760-438-2620. This geranium-splashed blue-and-white Bavarian chalet is more than a butcher's shop. It's a combination butcher-deli-diner. Enter through the bulging deli and listen for the shouts and clatter of serving ladies. Look for the "Es ist Wunderbar!" sign over the counter. Try German and American dishes like Big John's all-you-can-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage. Owner Big John is a heavyweight Olympic boxer from the former East Germany with an MA in meat sciences. Generous portions abound. Weekends after 4 p.m., he roasts his famous prime rib dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Vigilucci's 505 South Coast Highway 101 (at D Street), Encinitas, 760-942-7332. In the Land of 10,000

Trattorias, this is one of the most popular — and for good reason. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations include Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Pizzeria in Leucadia, and Vigilucci's Seafood and Steakhouse in Carlsbad. — N.W. (10/01)

The Village Grill 2833 State Street (at Carlsbad Village Drive), Carlsbad, 760-729-3601. This little café is famous for two things: its vintage Coca-Cola decorations and its delicious Tommyburgers, named after the guy who opened this place back in 1976. Tommy believed in fresh ingredients, says son Dale, now in charge, who orders only "extra lean" meat from the local butcher for his burgers. For breakfast, check out the eggs and sausage-patty special with fried-skin potatoes and hot-buttered toast. And if you surf, bring your board — the beach is just across the tracks. Breakfast and lunch Monday through Saturday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

NORTH INLAND

150 Grand Cafe 150 West Grand Avenue (between Broadway and Maple), Escondido, 760-738-6868. Chef Carlton Greenawalt cooks up a seasonal American-Mediterranean menu with a few touches of Asian-fusion, using local and organic produce wherever possible. Among the pick hits: a clever almond-crusted manchego cheese appetizer, a definitive trout amandine, and interesting desserts, including a lovely lemon-tinged crème brûlée. Reservations advisable on weekends. Childrens' and vegetarian meals available on request. Street parking may be difficult; leave time to hunt. Dining rooms often noisy. Live music (mainly jazz) most Thursdays through Saturdays after dinner hours in Back Room Lounge. Moderate prix fixe dinners weeknights; slightly expensive à la carte on weekends. — *N.W. (10/03)*

A Delight of France 126 West Escondido, Grand Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-746-2644. This authentic French bakery is one of the best in the region, offering daily baked authentic baguettes, brioches, quiches, and croissants, including a luscious almond croissant studded with nuts and laced with sweet almond paste. They claim to use all-organic ingredients, even the eggs, and locally grown produce. For a hearty breakfast, you can choose omelets, frittatas, French toast, and eggs. Lunch dishes include several savorv tarts, a French deli plate, crêpes, salads, and sandwiches. And ooh la la, there are dessert pastries, too. Open for brunch/lunch and pre-dinner snacks Tuesday through Saturday; lunch/brunch only on Sunday. Inex-pensive. — N.W. (5/05) Saturday;

Bolsa Vietnamese Restaurant 9225 Mira Mesa Boulevard #118 (be-

9225 Mira Mesa Boulevard #118 (behind Wendy's), 858-693-3663. "The name 'Bolsa' isn't Vietnamese," says Kim Trang. "It's Spanish for 'bag." She's playing on words here: Trang once owned *Pho Bolsa* on University Avenue, and every Vietnamese knows *pho bo* is Vietnam's most popular quick meal, a beef rice noodle soup. At this location, Trang still makes excellent *pho bo*, but she has 122 other items as well, including fried catfish with ginger fish sauce, healthy (non-fried) Vietnamese spring rolls, or egg rolls with lettuce and mint in which to wrap them (sprinkled with *nuoc mam*, Vietnamese fish sauce). We're talking family-style cooking. Come once and Trang will remember you and everything you ate even if it was just *pho bo*. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (2/03)*

Golden Egg Omelet House 316 West Mission Avenue (at Escondido Boulevard), Escondido, 760-489-6420. This breakfast-lunch treasure-house is vast but cute, its brick walls and open beams festooned with knickknacks (all for sale). This is *the* place on Sunday mornings, when three generations bond over great, generous breakfasts. Omelets are perfect — light, thin crêpelike eggs wrapped around tall mounds of elaborate fillings. Thick waffles can be topped with fresh seasonal fruit. And then there are eggs, hash, crêpes, humongous burgers, and sandwiches. The potato casseroles, with a choice of a dozen fillings, are as huge in flavor as

Hunan 16719 Bernardo Center Drive, Rancho Bernardo, 858-487-8131. This casual family restaurant serves the cuisines of two spicy Chinese provinces, Szechuan and Hunan each with its own dedicated chef — but both chefs tone the spice way down to a suburban American comfort level. If you don't already know the difference between these neighboring cuisines you're unlikely to learn them here. But you can have an enjoyable meal: Teasmoked duck, eggplant Hunan-style and shredded potatoes with pickled vegetables are the outstanding dishes. If you're planning on a multicourse feast, order your meal a few dishes at a time or everything will be served at once; the staff is accommodating but limited-English. Over 20 vegan entrées. Full bar, Chinese beers, generic wines. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive, - N.W. (8/04)

Madras Cafe 9484 Black Mountain Road, Mira Mesa, 858-695-6229. In the same strip mall as Ashoka the Great, this family-friendly café features the savory vegetarian cuisine of South India. It's distinctly different from the standard North Indian menus, centering on numerous varieties of stuffed pancakes — from thin, crisp (and irresistible) crêpe-like dosais stuffed with vegetable curry to lacy rice-flour aapams drenched in coconut milk to hefty, frittata-like uttapams. (Try the latter with the delicious, not-too-spicy chile-onion stuffing.) Puffy poori bread and tamarind rice are spectacular. Order your dishes in the sequence you hope to eat them - that's usually how they come out of the kitchen. And don't expect hovering "Raj"- style serv-ice — it's just not the Tamil way. Seasoning is generally mild, to accommodate kiddies; spicy sauces are on the table. No alcohol. Open Tuesday through Sunday with buffet lunches and à la carte dinners. Inexpensive. -N.W. (1/03)

Pearl Chinese Cuisine 11666 Avena Place (at Webb Park), Rancho Bernardo, 858-487-3388. At Emerald Restaurant's younger, prettier subur-ban sister, you'll find modern Hong Kong-style Chinese cuisine, including both familiar and exotic dishes. Daytimes are for dim sum (Chinese tapas), served daily until 3 p.m., plus champagne dim sum brunches on weekends. Along with standard items, the choices here leap to the latest Pacific creations, some rarely found this side of the ocean, including irresistible Shanghai soup dumplings. Dinners range from folk food to showy "gold cup" dishes. For a taste treat and visual hoot, try the sea bass with pine nuts, sculpted to resemble a dish sponge. International wine list at modest markups complements the cooking. Full bar. Frying done in salad (not peanut) oil. Reservations advised. Lunch and dinner on weekdays; three meals on weekends. Moderate, with some expensive specialties. -N.W. (8/04)

GOLD COAST

Americana 1454 Camino Del Mar (southwest corner at 15th Street), Del Mar, 858-794-6838. Housed in a historic building, this casual breakfast/lunch joint turns into a serious dinner house at nightfall. The cooking represents the American melting pot, featuring world-wide flavors. Mornings, along with flawless eggs Benedict and utopian waffles, you can get a "Roman breakfast" of prosciutto, mozzarella, and fried egg on English muffin. At dinner, don't miss the lamb chop and eggplant appetizer or the duck breast with fig sauce. Some of the veggies come from chef-owner Randy Gruber's own home garden: the French fries (which don't come from his garden) are world-class. To finish, a banana tarte tatin shouldn't be resisted. Thoughtful, reasonable wine list Breakfast (until 3 p.m.) and lunch daily, dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Kids' menu available. Breakfast and lunch inexpensive to moderate;

Cafe Europa 667 San Rodolfo Drive Suite 133, Marshall's Shopping Center, Solana Beach, 858-793-4693. The menu in this gemütlich dining room is mainly German but flirts with France and Italy. The Peruvian owners some times offer a South American special at lunch, and Cuzqueño is among the bottled beer brands. The standard German preparations here encompass sausage plates, rather thin-cut schnitzels, meat stews, et al. Lighter dishes include chicken breasts, seafood, and three vegetarian entrées. The outstanding veggie sides include succulent home fries, delicately sweet red cab-bage, and a house salad featuring pickled cukes in sour cream. Nice, quiet service with no put-on oom-pah-pah. Dessert chef Jack Fisher contributes superlatively happy, avant-garde endings. The flies in the buttermilk? The service is Space Cadet Corps, and during dinner, the room is usually noisy. The dishes look and taste wonderful. All items available for takeout. No dinner Saturday; closed Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

French Pastry Shop 5550 La Jolla Boulevard (at Forward Street), La Jolla, 858-454-9094. A longstanding fixture of the Bird Rock area, this bakery/restaurant includes both a sim ple, spacious dining room and a shaded patio (reputedly San Diego's first dining patio). Breakfast — a highlight of the menu — is served until 6 p.m. The whisper-thin crêpes with luscious stuffings speak in a Gallic accent. Other possibilities include omelets, eggs Benedict variations, and fine-quality brioches and croissants. Pastries are moist, fairly light, and very sweet. Dinner entrées focus on updated French classics, e.g., duck breast a' l'orange, with "early bird" bargains. Open daily for breakfast through early dinner. - N.W. 

Trattoria Acqua 1298 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-0709. This popular restaurant has charming decor, with arched doorways dividing a war-ren of white-painted, high-ceilinged rooms and terraces arranged around a tiled, heated courtyard. The seasonally changing menu could be called "avant-garde Italian," a style that more than pushes the Italian envelope with as-sorted international influences. The food can be divine — or dismaying. Given Acqua's "destination restaurant status, there's a surprising air of bean-counting that manifests itself in oddly lightweight silverware, waiters unclear about proper wine service, and, at times, tired veggies. Desserts, though, are superb. Full bar with extensive, wide-ranging wine list that includes half bottles as well as choices by the glass. Walk-ins accepted but weekend reservations advised. Restaurant is two floors down from Prospect, with vali-dated parking in underground garage on Coast Boulevard. Elevator access from both directions (Acqua's stop is the first floor). Lunch or brunch and dinner seven days. Moderate (pastas) to very expensive. - N.W. (11/04)

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Adam's Steak N' Eggs 1201 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-291-1103. Morning munchers take heart! Adam's has served nothing but breakfasts since 1966. The menu runs from healthy — hot oatmeal with raisins, dates, sunflower seeds, almonds, pineapple, and coconut — to corn fritters to a Southern brunch of spicy sausage patties, biscuits, gravy, grits, and eggs, to spiced apple crèpes with whipped cream and pecans. But the signature dish is steak and eggs. The steak's a high-walled chunk of meat almost as thick as it is round. Comes with two eggs, potatoes or grits, and toast or tortillas. You won't need lunch. This bricky, dark wood, clubby, businessconvention-tourist kind of place has ver-ry faithful customers. But if you want to walk there, be ready for lack of sidewalks, one-way bus access, and wild morning traffic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02) **Aladdin's Cafe** 5420 Clairemont

Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-573-0000; Uptown Shopping Cen ter, 1220 Cleveland Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-574-1111. These cafés offer a bright, clean atmosphere for bright and clean, if rather generic, Middle Eastern favorites (hummus, tabbouleh, kebabs shawerma, etc.), plus imaginative Lev antine-flavored pizzas and salads. There are ample choices for vegetarians. The Hillcrest location offers beer and wine. Hillcrest's new owners also offer a more Lebanese cuisine. Inexpensive to moderate. - N.W. (11/00) Boo Cho Korean Barbecue 7905 Engineer Road (a block east of Con-voy), Kearny Mesa, 858-573-2585. What sets Boo Cho apart from other Korean barbecues is that wood charcoal rather than gas fuels the tabletop grills — proving easier to control as well as lending more flavor. The *galbi* (short ribs) here are outstanding, with tender meat and a subtly sweet mari-nade, and the *hae mui pa jun* (mixed seafood pancake) is moist and light. As at all Korean restaurants, with any dinner you'll receive numerous small plates of relishes and vegetables (called *pan chan*), lending a multitude of fla-vors to the meal. But since Korean dinners are traditionally served all at once, if you want a first-course soup or appetizer, order it separately, and when it arrives, order your main course. (Table room can get skimpy once the grill gets going.) The menu includes three "family combination dinners" but they're written in Korean; if interested, ask the owner or manager to translate for you. Open Monday through Friday for lunch: daily for dinner. Moderate. -N.W. (11/03)

China Max 4698 Convoy Street (at Engineer), Kearny Mesa, 858-650-3333. The decor is plain and bright, the sound-level loud, but this is a major resource for authentic Hong Kong cooking — creative and multiregional, filtered through the refined wizardry of the genuine Cantonese style. The seafood aswim in the live tanks includes such delicacies as black cod (bony but wonderfully sweet), Dungeness crab, and (if you've got the money) abalone — but even inexpensive, homey dishes (e.g., wonton soup, crabmeat cakes) sing with flavor. The exemplary crispy squab and Peking duck must be ordered at least a day in advance, but you'd better call ahead anyway for reservations to avoid a wait at the door. A Pan-Asian community throngs here, for good reason. Lunch weekdays, dinner seven days, with lunch menu returning nightly from 9 p.m. to midnight. Inexpensive to exorbitant, but mainly moderate. — *N.W. (1/04)*

Dumpling Inn 4619 Convoy Street #F, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-9638. Holein-the-wall? Yes. But what a hole-inthe-wall. For those who love the Far East and its food, finding the Dumpling Inn is a little revelation. It's located in the busy Jasmine/Korean Market Cen-ter among Oriental herbalists, mansize-vase shops, even feng shui experts. The Inn itself is tiny but charming. Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold firecrackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd coni-cal straw hat. The food is serious but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried three-ingredient *lo mein* (thick noo-dles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are chal-lenging and exciting, as is the Dumpling Dinner (including hot-andsour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jellyfish salad - crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Lunch and early dinner, closed Monday. Inexpensive. -E.B. (5/02)

Lightnin' Jacks BBQ Clairemont Town Square, 4705-H Clairemont Drive (near movieplex), Clairemont, 858-270-8227. Clean, cute, and a little self-conscious, this barbecue (under the same ownership as next-door Dino's Greek Restaurant) has blackand-white Western pictures on the walls and some seating on barstools with metal "saddles" (more comfortable than they look). The barbecue mechanism is a Texas-style pit smoker burning sweet hickory. The meats that emerge from it aren't the smokiest, but they're tasty enough. Pork ribs are ten-

der and moist, and beef brisket carries enough smoke flavor to pass muster in Texas; other meat choices are less successful. The tomatoey sauce is pleasant but ordinary. A fried catfish plate makes a flavorful alternative (but beware the cat sandwich, awash in hot sauce). Hush puppies and sweet potato fries are the most savory sides. Check your take-out bag to make sure you're getting what you ordered, as youthful staff is easily flustered. Kiddie plates available. Draft beer and wine available. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (1/05) **New Shanghai** 4681 Convoy Street,

Kearny Mesa, 858-569-4833. New Shanghai is busy, friendly, and draws a mostly Chinese clientele because their Chinese food isn't "Americanized." Whatever your gastronomic politics, try the generous plateful of dry braised shrimp, the "de-fatted pork shoulder," the hot tripe, and the ingenious red bean pancake dessert. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *M.N.* (4/99)

Rosie and Joe's Grill & Cantina 7986 Armour Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-277-5777. Joe Polizzi and his wife Rosalie started this place in 1959. Now his son Paul and wife Lynn run it as a New Mexico-style eatery-sports barpatio café with karaoke and mini-golf. Popular dishes include the "Beerubin sandwich (corn beef on rye with sauerkraut, Gouda cheese), the Sweet Sicilian sandwich (grilled Italian sausage, sautéed onions, bell peppers, provolone), and the California Chili Burger (with roasted chilis, onions, Gouda cheese). Also good: the Pescado Vera Cruz (pan-grilled fish with caramelized onions). Yes, it's out in the industrial wilds of Kearny Mesa, but it has a Cheers feel to it. Open for lunch, dinner, seven days. Inexpensive; dinners moderate. — E.B. (1/04)

Spice House Cafe 9035 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Complex Drive, across from courthouse), 858-565-1028. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hangover Omelet. We don't know if it's the Ortega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. The place is a pleasant surprise jutting out into the top foliage of trees sprouting up from Hwy. 163 — the view looks like a forest. Other excellent choices include Portuguese sausage with three eggs, paisano frittata with ham, tomatoes, mushrooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped cream. Open daily, breakfast and lunch, dinner nightly, with emphasis on Greek-American cuisine. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

THE BEACHES

China Inn 877 Hornblend Street (between Garnet and Grand), Pacific Beach, 858-483-6680. The enormous menu here offers Mandarin and Szechuan specialties including especially good sweet-and-pungent shrimp, Mandarin pork rib, duck in orange sauce, and shrimp in garlic sauce. The setting is simple but the food is outstanding. If chef-owner Andy Kam is present, ask his advice about the day's best dishes. Open adily, continuous service, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

Fairouz Cafe And Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at low cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — *E.W.*

The Fishery 5040 Cass Street, Pacific Beach, 858-272-9985. Pacific Shellfish Seafood Company founder Judd Brown got his start as a commercial fisherman. He doesn't fish anymore, but he does everything else — supplying product to top-tier restaurants, retailing glistening specimens to hungry shoppers and serving patrons who want to dine in amid the icy-blue walls and gorgeous trophy fish. The Fishery's menu is equally extensive, covering So-Cal basics (excellent mahi-mahi burrito), lunchtime standards (sandwiches, fine malt-dredged fish and chips), sushi, and an ambitious lineup of dinnertime entrées, some of them

If ambition occasionally outstrips execution, an obsession with freshness helps compensate, and you get the sense that things are getting better all the time. The wine list is relatively inexpensive and carefully selected. Casual atmosphere. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — A.M. (12/03)

Karinya Thai & Vegetarian Cuisine 4475 Mission Boulevard (Sea-Coast Square), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie The Beach, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes getting off on the coconut curries like *gang ped*, *panang*, and *kang kari*. Or noodle dishes like the famous pad thai. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai origins. The *tom yum kung* (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table, the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course nam pla, Thai fish sauce. A nice coun-terpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: *pad talay*, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in *The Beach*. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (2/03)

Ranchos Cocina 1830 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-226-7619; 4705 Point Loma Avenue, Ocean Beach, 619-224-9815. Also at 3910 30th Street (at University Avenue), North Park, 619-574-1288. At all locations of this delightful mini-chain, you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak — in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an antojito stuffed with beef - it's stewed, not ground. And sample something with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, tryanything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No reservations, but

The menu is devoted to the "fruits of the sea" and includes a wonderful seafood platter (shrimp, squid, clams, fish, fries, and salad). And, of course, a crispy-crunchy fish-and-chips platter. Eat outside on deck, contemplating the small ships on the bay. They buy sea sonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their attached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fishermen. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Mondays. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

Stickee Fingers Barbeque Smokehouse 1404 Garnet Avenue (at Gresham), Pacific Beach, 858-581-6526. Chef-owner Sonny Choudo is an Egyptian Jew from Mex-ico City who learned to cook in Israel but fell in love with barbecue on a trip to Texas. This bright little room has big windows and a few tables, with Mexican folk art and chile-pepper posters on the walls. Outside is a pleasant wooden patio with a few more wooden tables and an oil drum smoker where the meats are cooked over sweet hickory chunks. Best bets are the tender pork ribs and smoky brisket. Sauce is shallow-flavored and very tomatoey. Sides include a lively coleslaw and an unexpectedly sophisticated heart of ro-maine salad with Caesar dressing. Street parking (difficult). Italian sodas, but no alcohol. Free delivery in PB with minimum order. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. N.W. (1/05)

World Famous 711 Pacific Beach Drive, Pacific Beach, 858-272-3100. World Famous is as on-the-beach as it gets, right on PB's boardwalk. It has a covered porch, a side-slung patio, and low-slung ceilings, so everything feels intimate. You sit down at varnished in-laid wooden tables, lots of diagonal timbering, and sexy blue lighting. It's often crowded and laugh-loud noisy. Who's gonna be food-picky here? You when you're paying twenty-some bucks for a steak or a piece of mako shark. The menu promises big with items like "Horseradish Crusted Salmon" and "Avocado and Pistachio Crusted Mako." Problem is, the taste of the mako is pleasant but underwhelming despite help from a mango-butter sauce, and the two 3-square-inch pieces of fish were only just enough. On the

other hand, the prime rib, surf n' turf, and tournedos will fill you fine. If you want to beat the big prices, try the beach burger or a seared ahi Caesar salad. And the view is free. Breakfast and lunch inexpensive; dinners moderate to expensive. Open daily. — E.B. (1/04)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Just Fabulous Kensington 4116 Adams Avenue, Kensington 619-584-2929. At this usually-packed café, painted in cheerful Creamsickle colors, noted dessert-chef Beryl Ann Byrd and co-chef Kurt Metzger offer a full menu of seasonal California-Mediterranean cuisine. At dinner, appetizers are generally fun to eat but entrées can be inconsistent. Weekend brunch dishes are terrific. The primary emphasis is on desserts, of course: Byrd's pastries are of the Euro-influ-enced American mode — very sweet, a little heavy, a touch more sophisticated than Mom's apple pie. The pastry case doubles as a retail counter for sweets-to-go. Affordable international wine list and coffeehouse specialty beverages. Few tables, no reservations. Arrive early or late on weekends or expect to wait. No alcohol allowed at outdoor tables. Street parking only. Open three meals daily. Moderate. — *N.W.* (9/04)

Jyoti-Bihanga 3351 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-282-4116. Oh sure, you'll be watching Sri Chinmoy, the Bengali guru, on TV juggling, declaring Geneva International Airport a "Peace Blossom," or boarding his Italian "*Treno della Pace*." Plus, his books, his portraits, his paintings, and his chant-songs surround you. Apart from that, not only is this heavenly blue-domed restaurant run by his students peaceful, but the fresher-thanfresh Bengali-tinged health food is delicious. Their chutney-topped "Neatloaf" bursts with nutty, intriguing flavors. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes different. Also delish: Brahma Burrito, "Infinite Blue" (interesting brown rice salad with bleu cheese dressing), and the Shiva Wrap (tofu and fresh veggies with a well-integrated curry flavor). On cold days, start with a steaming sweet pea soup. Monday through Saturday lunch and dinner, Sunday brunch only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

Phuong Trang Vietnamese Seafood Restaurant 5296 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-582-0603. Original branch at 4170 Convov Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6750. Tired of putting up with the crowds at the popular Convoy Street restaurant? Go east, where you'll find the same menu without the hassles. The fare centers on Vietnamese "people's food" emphasizing numerous genres of noodle soups, but there are a handful of more elegant house specialties — including the extraordi-nary "Special Sauce" Dungeness crab from the live tank. (The sauce is tangy tamarind.) Call ahead to order steamed or grilled live-tank catfish. Reservations and credit cards accepted, both branches. Vietnamese beers including "33"; just two generic wines, but you can bring your own. Also bring a pad and write down the numbers of your orders to give the waiter, as staffers speak little English. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate (higher for live-tank seafood). — N.W. (3/04)

South Park Bar and Grill 1946 Fern Street, South Park/Golden Hill, 619-696-0096. A genuine American bistro. This loud, lively, very local watering hole started out serving savory comfort-food to an appreciative neighborhood patronage; now the whole city's flocking in. Chef Eric Wilburn learned his chops at Bradley Ogden's Lark Creek Inn; if he cooks "mom food," it's more than a cut above mom's. Appetizer/bar menu runs to ordinary pub-grub (but crab cakes or red pepper hummus stand out); entrées get interesting, including indul-gent "Stuffed Shrimp and Scallops Florentine," a juicy rib-eye steak, and a light-textured meat loaf. Nightly specials are always worth a try. Considerate service. Full bar, including international wines at easy prices. Park at edge of Gala lot. Reservations only for parties of five or more, so expect a wait most nights. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday; bar menu weekends until midnight; weekend brunches and weeknight reduced-price "early bird specials." Upper moderate to expensive. — N.W. (7/03)

Zensei 3396 30th Street (at Upas), North Park, 619-546-617. This muchwelcomed neighborhood restaurant in a restaurant-starved neighborhood offers a changing menu of sushi, fusion appetizers, and Japanese entrées emphasizing noodle dishes. The sushi is the main draw. It's well made and based on seafood from the same fishmonger used by Ota and Nobu. The enor-mous dark-wood chandeliers, the padded-leather wooden chairs, the chainsaw-weathered wood beams all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, reveling in the guitar trio and the exposed kitchen station — such atmosphere! And the flavors are userfriendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. The Camarones Tequila is a little more exciting; the sweetness of its baconwrapped shrimp gets a fine counter from the bitter liquor in the marinade. In July 2003 he moved his kitchen to La Mesa where he now cooks his in-ventive Japanese-based fusion cuisine with French, Mexican, and Chinese touches. Try the dreamy soft-shell crab with "salsa cream aioli," the tender tempura, or the traditional Teishoku dinner. Taka generally presides at the sushi bar. The staff is small so for the best cooking and service, dine on a weeknight and make an evening of it weekends can be hectic. For a bubbly treat try chilled Nigori (unfiltered) sake, served in the traditional manner in an overflowing square wooden cup. Open daily for dinner. Happy hour bargains nightly; regular prices moderate to expensive. — *N.W. (3/04)*

Downtown Cafe 182 East Main Street, El Cajon, 619-440-5687. Surprise! Not far from Magnolia and Maina French-style sidewalk café. And it works, maybe because of reasonable prices for baby-back pork ribs, giant burritos, or Louisiana Chicken strips. Or even the veggie burger. But it's partly where you dine: out on the patio. fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebbly-smooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character. Pablito's of the Desert 590 Palm Canyon Drive (in The Center, #8), Bor-rego Springs, 760-767-5753. Pablito's claims "Authentic Mexican Cuisine, patio dining, and great tequila mar-garitas." Well, the gorgeous patio is open only during busy times and the cuisine runs to gringo favorites in the Mexican mode (lots of combo platters). but the flavors are honest and pleasing. The most authentic dishes come from the "Specialties" section of the menu, including a good *chile verde* (pork in green chile sauce), numerous varieties of enchiladas, and several flavors of *chilaquiles*. Full bar, including sangria, margaritas, Mexican beers. Open daily, lunch and dinner (with break be tween). Inexpensive to low moderate. -N.W.(4/03)

Ramon's Smokehouse BBQ 1730 Alpine Boulevard, Suite 110, Alpine, 619-445-1008. The smell of mesquite wood burning under fresh-cut beef rib is beyond resistance. The secret Texas recipe draws crowds. Go Sunday morning, especially, when chefs in maroon aprons dance around the fat-spitting fire, disappearing into the clouds of fra grant smoke to flip the racks of beef and pork ribs. Bertrand at Mister A's 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel), 12th floor, Banker's Hill, 619-239-1377. Bertrand Hug's airy, open renovation of this formerly 'ancient regime" eatery offers a fabled panoramic city view with a casual-chic, highly romantic ambience. Chef Stephane Voitzwinkler's modern French cuisine is a fine fit for the setting, including bistro classics and fresh inventions, emphasizing top-grade seasonal ingredients. A huge, intelligent wine list covers a full range of prices, ages and origins, including "ripe" first-growth Bordeaux. Smoking and fairweather dining on wraparound terrace/observation deck. Note: parking entrance on Fourth Avenue; wheelchair access via ramp to left of reception desk. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Expensive. — N.W. (2/04)

Brians' American Eatery 1451 Washington Street (near Lincoln), Hill-crest, 619-296-8268. Also at 7947 Balboa Avenue (off Convoy), Kearny Mesa, and 828 Sixth Avenue, Gaslamp. Note the apostrophe: Not one but two Brians have taken over what had been Topsy's, a venerable coffeehouse/eatery for 40 years. They've done a good job of cleaning it up without gutting the fifties roadhouse character. It's open all night on weekends, and late night is quite a scene. But for a lot of people, breakfast is the thing. The Brians 8-ounce charbroiled top sirloin steak with eggs and country potatoes is a great Saturday morning treat. Or the "Hey Ricky!!!," an omelet with chorizo, avocado, green chilies, onions, and cheeses. Or ask for their off-menu breakfast special — it's always cheaper. Another good thing: You get a pitcher of iced lemon-water, and coffee comes by the Thermos-full. Three meals until 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday; open 24 hours from early Friday morn ing until Sunday evening. Inexpensive. - E.B. (10/02)

Celadon Royalty Thai Restau rant 540 University Avenue (near Sixth), Hillcrest, 619-297-8424. The menu was originally devised by a chef who cooked for the Siamese royal family. Some folk come for the Jewish food (chicken-in-the-pot, brisket of beef, chopped liver), others to soak in the art-deco colors — the cornucopia of fruit above the entrance. the mustard yellow walls, the blackand-white checker tile, or the flower bunches of red, blue, green, and yellow lamps. Scandalously delicious. Downside? Our pastrami sandwich tasted dry and chewy by comparison. Wait staff are good-humored, and the Seeburg Wall-o-Matic tableside jukeboxes actually work. Bring plenty of quarters. Breakfast all day; early-bird dinner specials; late-night dining. Open from 7 a.m. till midnight; until 2 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/03)

Hamburger Mary's 308 University (at Third), Hillcrest, Avenue 619-491-0400. All the action is on the patio, under ficus trees, ferns, the palapa bar, and white umbrellas. Bougainvillea bursts out of tables. Hamburger Mary's mural comes at you in a Stetson, wild red hair, big blue eves, and a plump butt. Basically it's a gay rendezvous, but everybody's welcome. The burgers are way-big with funky titles like the "I'm Sooo Bleu" burger with bacon and bleu cheese crumbles, or the "Two Tons Of Fun," a six-inchhigh double-burger with mushrooms, bacon, lettuce, cheese, and onions. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the housestyle - sky-high, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Dinner served daily. Reservations strongly advised. La Posta de Acapulco's Taco Shop 3980 Third Avenue (at Wash n). Hillcrest. 619-295-8982 (Also in Lakeside and Spring Valley.) People have been coming to this orange-and-white drive-through-without-cars for 20 years. One of the main reasons is the carne asada burritos. Rich-tasting, fresh, generous. Folks sit around the outside benches right next to Washington Street, oblivious to the traffic Also much loved here are the *chile verde* and the quesadilla with carne asada. For breakfast, think chorizo burrito. And for value, just to fill you up, you can't beat the bean tostada. You can drink horchata, a rice drink, or jamaica, made from hibiscus flower, to complete the picture. Open 24 hours. Inexpensive. – E.B. (1/04)

The Mission North Park and **City Bakery** 2801 University Avenue, North Park, 619-220-8992 (also at Mission Beach and East Village). "Urban assault food for a revolutionary people," says the waitstaff's black T-shirts. But the food here is less revolutionary than halfway between health-nut and greasy spoon. Still, their "conscientious cuisine" is generous, good looking, and intelligent, if a little middle-class timid. Breakfasts are big here. Delicious chicken-apple sausage and eggs come on a foot-wide plate loaded with unskinned rosemary potatoes, scrambled eggs, and scrumptious baked-on-the-spot rosemary bread. Pancakes and French cinnamon toast are popular sta-

Taste of Szechuan 670 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-291-1668 Friendly staff serves up standard Szechuan Mandarin fare at this archetypical Chinese restaurant. Szechuan Garlic Shrimp is number one on the list of twelve House Specialties for good reason. This tangy dish of crispy, deep-fried shrimp is one of their best. Not often seen on the menus of strip mall Chinese restaurants, the Szechuan Orange Fish is also recommended, but don't be misled by the "hot & spicy" star next to this item. As with any of their "spicy" offerings, the heat in this dish barely registers. Spice lovers should ask for an extra kick. The Toffee Banana and Toffee Apple desserts may tempt you, but unless you have a dentist on-call, it's best to pass on these super-sticky sweets. Inexpen-sive lunch specials. Open late until midnight Monday through Thursday, un-til 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday, and until 10 p.m. on Sundays. Inexpensive to moderate. — B.D. (6/05)

In a comfortable setting, the Persian menu offers just a "pick hits list" of popular dishes culled from this fabled cuisine, but the cooking is first rate, featuring fine ingredients prepared with care, skill, and healthful-ness. The superlative lamb-and-rice stuffed grape leaves are vibrant with fresh herbs. The "Bandar Special" entrée combo lets you choose any two ke-babs (chicken, game hen, beef, or lamb), beautifully marinated and cooked to your order. Entrées featuring rice with poultry are elaborate and refined, spiked with tangy barberries, sour cherries, or lentils and dates. A typical en-trée includes a hunk of red (or "the other white") meat cooked on a woodfired grill, smeared with a precooked sauce that, for better or worse, first meets its mate on the plate. Meatavoiders will find fish and poultry dishes, too. Tasty taters but dull veggies come with most entrées. Desserts run to fruity favorites like cobblers, crisps, and upside-down cake. Treats from the wide-ranging beverage list include three-glass wine flights in four styles of wine, and a pleasant house brew, Dakota Pale Ale, that suits the food. The two-floor restaurant offers big plush booths, tall windowed walls, and a piano player gliding from rinky-dink 1950's pop to Fats Waller stylings and Ellingtonian riffs. Valet parking. Full bar. Lunch weekdays; dinner nightly. High moderate to expensive. N.W. (9/04)

DeMedici 815 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-7228. This lovely, cream-and-sepia dining room evokes an Italian Renaissance villa, while its sidewalk patio offers a prime pageant of Gaslamp follies. Either way, you'll enjoy exceptional service — attentive but utterly unobtrusive — and a menu centered on succulent pastas and refined seafood dishes. The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress on the spiffier side — some Hollywood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, up-ping the clothing curve. Dinner 5 p.m.to 10:30 p.m. weekdays, 5 p.m. to midnight weekends. Moderatepriced valet parking available. Moderate (simpler pastas) to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

Dublin Square 554 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-239-5818. The entire pub was hand-crafted in Waterford, shipped over, and installed (by Irish craftsmen) in the Gaslamp. The exte-rior indeed resembles a real (but very new) Dublin pub; the interior has au-thentically dim lighting and spirited Irish music including live bands (acoustic but loud) during Happy Hours and some evenings. If you're looking for food, too, there's a shockingly fine corned beef and cabbage, resembling the corned beef of Katz's Deli on the Lower East Side - it's that wee touch o' the garlic that does the trick. Other choices include Guinness beef stew, shepherd's pie (made with ground beef), chicken pot pie, steaks, lamb chops, fish and chips, and grilled fish, plus standard pub grub. Lunch and dinner (including Irish breakfast any time) daily. Moderate. — N.W. (3/02)

Kansas City Barbecue 610 West Market Street (at Harbor Drive), downtown, 619-231-9680. Scrumptious smells waft across the tracks at the Seaport Village trolley stop - barbecued pork and beef. And yeah, this is the joint where Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis did their "sleazy bar scene" in Top Gun. And it is kinda sleazy, especially in the shadowy horseshoe bar,

with memorabilia like hanging bras, Czech license plates, and stickers ("Grow Your Own Dope: Plant A Man"). The beef and pork ribs (or rib tips or chicken breast) are worth it. They're cooked over an oak-fueled fire. Nice long Happy Hour (3:30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., at bar only) has great food/grub deals. Open daily, lunch un-til late, serving until 1 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (3/01)

The Latin Room 560 Fourth Avenue (at Market), Gaslamp, 619-237-7800. This austere, concrete-floored space is mainly a tequila bar, offering at least 120 brands to sample and tasty Mexican cocktails made from scratch. But you can also get a reasonably interesting Mexican meal from a menu that's considerably more ambitious than the neighborhood's regular border-Mex yawns. It offers excellent tortilla soup, decent ceviche, and filet mignon strewn with *cuitlacoche* (a.k.a. "corn mush-rooms," a mild and juicy black fungal delicacy), with recipes imported here by a chef who used to cook at Tijuana's revered Cien Años restaurant. A couple can easily make a meal of a few shared appetizers. At 10 p.m. weekends, the place goes disco, with cover charge (IDs checked). Open nightly for dinner, appetizer menu until 2 a.m. on weekends. Moderate to expensive. -N.W. (1/04)

Max New York Steakhouse and Seafood 827 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-235-8500. As steakhouses go, Max is a good value, offering huge portions of fine, gently raised near-organic meat, cooked to order and offered at relatively gentle prices. You don't even have to pay extra for your veggies. For beef, there's full-flavored naturally raised Angus or butter-tender Kobe style Wagyu beef from Idaho. Or you can choose a giant rack of lamb, so tender it should be called "Certified Ag nus." Sauces tend to be pedestrian; re-quest them on the side. The classic steakhouse appetizers are done with some smart twists. Superb international wine list at below-average markups, including plenty by the glass Full bar. Valet parking, or inexpensive lot via alley two doors north. Open nightly, until midnight on weekends Upper moderate to very expensive. -N.W. (3/04)

Morton's of Chicago 285 J Street (between Second and Third), Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago

steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxurious, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their Nebraska beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-a-half or threepound porterhouse, which will be juicy, marbled with flavorful fat. You can also get good fish at Morton's. The big, golden salmon fillet flakes to the fork and is moist, sweet, buttery. The pricey à la carte sides are either bad or mediocre. The Godiva Hot Chocolate Cake is exceptional. But go for the steak. Expensive. - M.N. (9/99)

Nagi's Bar and Grill 501 West Broadway, downtown, 619-233-5933. Nagi Sekla comes from Egypt, via Paris. Before he took over the lease at the staid Koll Center's bar-eatery, he insisted on creating a sidewalk patio slap-dab on Broadway. His lease is our gain. For the first time you can eat, drink, and be merry right on this main drag. And there's nothing like scarfing lunch while you watch lawyers, tourists, and office workers hustle by in the morning sun. Lunch or dinner, start off with his homemade soups, but the must-eat is his Spicy Santa Fe Chicken Salad the magic's in the cranberries and Gorgonzola. Also great: BBQ chicken pizza. Lunch and dinner, Monday through Friday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/03)

Puerto la Boca 2060 India Street (at Hawthorn), Little Italy, 619-234-4900. Argentines love their beef and they love it lean and wholesome - free-range and grass fed. That's what you'll find at this uncompromisingly authentic out-post of Buenos Aires cuisine. The great national entrée is the mixed grill (parrillada) for two or more — a massive meatarama featuring numerous grilled cuts of marinated beef, chicken, and sausages. Start with luscious beef or corn empanadas or, if you're feeling hungry and adventurous, matambre (rolled beef galantine). Not a steak lover? Try the shrimp "la boca." Don't eat meat? There are vegetarian pastas and pizzas. Gnocchi (*ñoquis*) are served only on the 29th of each month. International, affordable choice of wines, plus Latin and U.S. beers. Full bar. Patio dining. Lunch and dinner daily until 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday and 8:30 p.m. Sunday. — *N.W. (8/05)*

Rainwater's on Kettner 1202 Kettner Boulevard (at B Street), Little Italy, 619-233-5757. You could order the fish, the chicken, or even the lamb, but odds

Sally's on the Water Manchester Grand Hyatt, 1 Market Place (Market and Harbor Drive, adjacent to Seaport Village), downtown, 619-358-6740. On an isolated "island" between the Hyatt and Seaport Village, in fair weather you'll catch great marina views from the terrace. Under inventive young French chef Fabrice Tissier, the fare is California-French with a summery Provençal accent and an accent on seafood. Don't miss the exquisite crab cakes or the classic bouillabaisse. If you'd like to know what the chef can do when he isn't limited by the tastes of hotel diners, with 48 hours notice you can book "The Chef's Table" inside the kitchen for six to twelve people and collaborate with him on a custom menu. Sally's interior is hard-edged modern and can be noisy. Full bar, good mainly California wine list. Validated parking in hotel garage. Call for wheelchair-ac cess directions. Lunch and dinner daily. Expensive. — N.W. (10/04)

Shortstop's Grille at Tivoli Bar 505 Sixth Avenue (at Island), Gaslamp, 619-232-6754. Ever heard of the Stingaree, downtown's old red light district? The 1885 Tivoli is one of its last survivors, the oldest bar in the Gaslamp, and Wyatt Earp was its most famous customer. The only thing new is Shortstop's Grille, but "Shortstop" Paulie is an old hand at feeding roaring appetites. He's an ex-Alaska fishing at cook. Best deal: the Tivoli Special a 1/3-pound burger with a domestic beer included. Other good fillers: the "Shortstop" sandwich (bacon, egg, tomato, cheese, on grilled sourdough) the tuna salad sandwich with fries, and grilled breast of chicken sandwich with fries. Remember to toast Wyatt and his wife Josie. They're on the wall. Lunch and dinner, Monday to Saturday. -E.B. (1/04)

Star of the Sea 1360 North Harbor Drive (at Ash), downtown, 619-232-7408. Here you'll find sparkling-fresh seafood in creative California-style treatments with organic, locally farmed produce, along with a long, interesting wine list offering some wonderful off-beat whites at moderate prices (along with the expected, exor bitant Chardonnays). Light eaters on a budget could make a luxury meal of any pair of appetizers. A recent renovation has given every table a clear view of the bay, but the price exacted by all that glass is a raucous noise level when full. Go early in the week for relative quiet. Service is friendly and knowledgeable. Valet parking fee; street parking feasible in cooler months. Reserva-tions needed — the joint is jumping. Dinner only, seven nights. Very expensive. -N.W. SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

Bistro D'Asia 1301 Orange Avenue (at B Avenue), Coronado, 619-437-6677. The relaxing restaurant attached to the hardy "Lizard Lounge" serves gentled-down dishes from all over East Asia. Among the tastiest are delicate lemon shrimps, vegetarian "monk's curry," and ice creams from Mootown Creamery. Peking Duck is accorded the full service, with a waitress garnishing the table's first round of delicate "flower buns" with crackly duck skin, scallions, and hoisin sauce. Lizard Lounge next door now houses a sushi bar as well as a liquor bar. Reserve for weekend dinners. Street park ing. Well-chosen wine list. Lunch and dinner daily. - N.W. (11/04)

Crown Room Hotel Del Coronado 1500 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-6611. Let's face it, this is one of the grandest entrances you'll make re, into the enormous, gloomy, vaulted timber dining room where presidents, princes and Marilyn Mon-roe have chowed down. It's only open for Sunday brunch these days. The gigantic eat-till-you're-beat buffet feast ranges from made-as-you-watch omelets to salmon, crab legs, prime rib, dizzying desserts, and even long-stemmed strawberries you hand-dip in chocolate. The downside? Monroe was here to shoot Some Like It Hot, but (apart from the chocolate) most food ain't. It's either cold (like the croissants, though the chocolate chunk ones are delicious) or luke-warm (like prime rib and eggs Benedict - and those eggs could do with a lot more Benedict). But this is an Edwardian-scale social occasion — see and be seen. The food isn't great, but the atmosphere is grand. Sundays, 9 a.m to 2 p.m. Expensive. — E.B. (9/03)

Lizard Lounge 1301 Orange Ave nue (at B), Coronado, 619-437-6677, This venerable saloon, a Navy oldtimers' favorite since the era when lounge lizards in leisure suits stalked the earth, now houses a good little sushi bar at one end of its spirits bar. The rice is well-seasoned, the seafood tastes sparkling-fresh, and each nigiri is given its own individual garnish (e.g., lemon with the *hamachi* roll). Most of the in-side-out party rolls are variations of the California roll formula, with the same center of sweet crab and avocado, but there's also a lively mango-albacore roll, featuring tempura shrimp, avocado, and ponzu. For best seats and peaceful eating, come early; the bar fills fast and the room can get downright rowdy as the night rolls on. Street parking. Lunch/dinner daily. Moderate. N.W. (11/04)

Lydia's Cafe and Nightclub 1628 Palm Avenue, San Diego, 619-429-3603. This easygoing dancing/eatery has a faithful following that goes back to 1957. But before you dance, eat! Check out the *birria en su jugo* (goat in its juices) with beans, rice, and tortillas, or enjoy filling snacks like *taquitos, cucaracha* (a corn tortilla stuffed with ham, cheese, and sour cream), or the snack Lydia says she invented: *botanas* (beans, pork, and melted cheese over corn chips). Open from early breakfast to early dinner Sunday through Wednesday, until midnight Thursday and Friday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

McP's Irish Pub & Grill 1107 Or-Coronado, Avenue, ange 619-435-5280. With a crowd ranging from Navy retirees to chic singles barely of drinking age, the perpetual party on McP's' patio is nurtured by above-average Irish-Mexican-American pub grub (burgers, potato skins, nachos, etc.). The Irish fare includes a pleasing Mulligan stew served in a hollowed bread-loaf and an absolutely fabulous corned beef and cabbage plate with tender, thick slices surrounding cabbage so young and sweet it ought to be carded. Good soups, too. Open daily, standard pub hours. (Breakfast Sunday during football season.) Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

Primavera 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454. This standout in Coronado's culinary scene offers courtly charm and an impressive menu. Try their saftron risotto, clams bordelaise, or the delicious ossobuco, of which every detail is accomplished, admirable. For dessert, have one of their excellent espressos and the tiramisu or lemon ricotta cake. Primavera's accomplished staff takes unpretentious pride in their kitchen, the food and wine they serve, and rightfully so. Open daily. Expensive. — *M.N. (11/98)*

Village Club Card Room 429 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-425-3333. Yes, it's mostly poker players, but any body can come in and order a meal. And here's the thing: first-time visitors get their meal free. Really. Players or nonplayers. Of course, the idea is to keep players' bellies full so they can return to the game, so even secondtimers get a deal with down-home comfort-dishes like grilled chicken breast sandwich, spaghetti with meatballs and garlic bread, or garlic shrimp with fried rice and egg, plus Chinese dishes including Kung Pao beef or chicken, Mongolian beef, and a good wonton soup with noodles. Open 24 hours. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/04)

BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number

Big Boy Restaurant Agua Caliente ulevard #9892 (across the street from the old bullring), Tijuana, 686-3788. Besides having excellent Mexican-American food, this Big Boy knock-off draws some of the most interesting people in Tijuana — journalists, lawyers, cattle ranchers, politicians, Baja's heavy hitters. Day or night, Big Boy is always busy. Gringo food's no problem. Breakfast in-cludes eggs, bacon, sausage, chorizo or ham, plus hash browns or frijoles, toast. juice, and endless coffee. Nobody will object if you sit sipping the free refills till the moon comes up. But you won't you'll crack and order more when you smell the popular, macho "royal" hamburger, with two beef patties, smoked ham, onions, lettuce, tomatoes, fries, and salad. Or the chicken breast marinated

in tequila with cilantro, guacamole, and beans. Open 24/7. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Cafe la Especial Avenida Revolución #718 (down the market steps), Tijuana, 685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American aficionados of , Fijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros, Summer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-to-gringos ratio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to carne asada and bis tek ranchero, from cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the steamed taco stand upstairs. That's still going too. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. E.B. (5/02)

El Faro de Mazatlan Boulevard Sánchez Taboada #9542, Plaza Financiera, Zona Río, Tijuana, 684-8882, 684-8883, or 684-2236. We're talking safe, reliable, middle-class fish-fare here. The "Lighthouse of Mazatlan" is bright blue, and white with smart varnished wood furniture and delivers fish, lobster, oyster, squid, and shrimp dishes that are easy to like. Generous free appetizers in clude marlin ceviche, fried fish, and fish albondigas soup. The interesting part is in trying dishes like the sea snail salad. (After a few closed-eve bites, it's delicious -like eating a sliced clam. It's great in a Caesar.) Look for original ways with octopus, pez espada (swordfish) and others. One of the simplest, best dishes: the cabicucho (Mexican seabass), charbroiled but moist and really better without its ranchero sauce. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. -E.B. (6/05)

El Rodeo Boulevard Salinas #1647, Tijuana, 686-5640. This 30-year-old steak haven sits on traffic-drowned Salinas, but climb onto its porch and you're at some Sonoran desert rancho, saguaro cacti and all. Inside it's dark wood and brick, wagon wheels, lariats, rifles, longhorns, and generous amounts of cattle-ranch food. Entrée price includes a delicious soup of roast beef juices, beans cooked in their own juices, a quesadilla, a salad, two *botana* (snack) plates, of, say, vinegary veggies and potatoes, and a beef liver medley, flour tortillas, chips, and hot sauce. You can get any cut of steak you want. A parrillada — BBQ dish — gives you marinated beef rib, carne asada, and barbecued chicken, all sizzling on a rancho-style metal tabletop grill that glows with hot coals. Best part: the roasted spring onions splayed across the meat. Dessert and coffee also included. Good place for a party. Open 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. -EB(5/05)

La Baguette Blvd. Lázaro Cárdenas #1030 (a.k.a. Blvd. Costero, opposite Sanborn's between Castillo and Blancarte), Ensenada, 646-178-2814. For those who take their java straight and strong, this is a good stop for a quick continental breakfast or dessert, with quite possibly the best French Roast coffee in town. Open daily during the day. Inexpensive. — N.W. (4/03)

La Escondida Santa Monica #1 (in Fraccionamiento Las Palmas), Tijuana, 681-4458. This hidden ("escondida") mansion has been a restaurant for three decades. The terrazzo and garden overlooking the Tijuana River valley make breakfast and dinners a treat. House specialties are more interesting than the regular fare. Try the seafood casserole (cacerola de mariscos), the tambor (a dish of layered beef, cheese, and pork), or the roasted baby Monterrey goat ("cabrito tatemado"). Desserts include the house especial, mango and ice cream with rompope (Mexican egg nog), and *crepas* de cajeta con nieve, crêpes with walnuts, green pistachio ice cream, and "burnt milk" caramel sauce — the nearest thing to liquid fudge this side of paradise. On weekends the place rocks with parties and live music. The big downside: It's hard to find. Take Agua Caliente Boulevard one half mile past the racetrack, turn right at Las Palmas, then left at the "Rey del Pollo" sign. The La Escondida entrance sign is in red neon at the road's end. Open daily for breakfast, lunch, dinner, Moderate, -E.B. (1/05)

La Lena Agua Caliente Boulevard #11191, Tijuana, 686-2920. The nicest thing about La Leña ("The Fire Log") is its view. You come off noisy, fumey, traffic-wracked Agua Caliente into this quiet. dark-wood, creamy-yellow walled room and a full view of ... countryside! Actually, a green golf course studded with trees. In the middle of Tijuana? Golfers thwack balls, giant mowers look like *Star Wars* creatures. So no surprise that you get country-club type eating: open-grill charro food for well-to-do charros. Oldstyle BBO steaks, surf-and-turf combos and big slabs of Mexican-cut filete cabrería, which are flabby but tender. Most arrive at your table sizzling on black iron hotplates. Servings are generous (meals come with soup or salad and you get a free appetizer such as shredded beef and tortillas) if not remarkable. Or even especially Mexican — their hamburger is darned tasty. But the atmosphere is a great break from the raucous TJ we all now and (sometimes) love. Lunch and dinner daily from 11 a.m. until late. Moderate. — *E.B.* (10/04)

La Vuelta Avenida Revolución #8210 (above 11th), Tijuana, 685-7309. Bring your lover here and hide away in one of the cuddly *carretitas* — nooks. Even if traffic is ghastly at "the turn" (*"la vuelta"*) where Revolución hooks left, you forget all that inside this vestige of Olde Tijuana with balcony seating, resident mariachis and food and drink all day and night. Dive into a *combinación mexicana* (chile relleno, taco, and enchilada) or *carne* asada served in an olla de barro, an earthenware pot from Guadalajara. Even the gringo-sounding filete mignon with mushroom sauce somehow comes out Mexican. Most Mexicans actually turn up about 1 a.m., after their own parties, to be serenaded by the excellent 10-piece mariachi band. Inexpensive. — E.B. (6/03)

The Original BBQ chicken pizza, the chain's first hit, is still their top seller. It has barbecue sauce, smoked Gouda and mozzarella cheeses, BBO chicken, red onions, and cilantro. The BBQ chicken chopped salad is good too, as is the jambalaya. If you've got a sweet tooth, but are embarrassed to order "Hawaiian" pizza. try the pear and Gorgonzola. It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions, Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. At night, the Nobel Drive branch features a view of the shining Mormon cathedral. A seafood chain with a good Cajun cor-porate name (Landry's) based in southern Louisiana wouldn't survive without some pluses besides a Bourbon Street party atmosphere. Joe's is silly with crab-shack ambiance (campy nautical paraphernalia on down to souvenir gimme caps), but the food's not bad. You can choose buckets of steamed, barbecued, or garlic crab (of various subspecies), or go for fried or grilled seafood or steaks, or salads. Grownups may prefer the patio to the rockin', raucous interior. Full bar, not much wine. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (5/01)

Ruth's Chris Steak House 11582 El Camino Real (at Arroyo Sorrento), Sorrento Hills, 858-755-1454. Flashcooked steaks from the finest wet-aged, corn-fed USDA Prime, seasoned with salt, pepper, butter, and parsley, are the hallmark of this 95-location chain. If you aren't a salt offender, ask the kitchen to use a lighter touch. All side dishes are à la carte but come in portions large enough to feed two. The broiled tomatoes, caramelized with a touch of sugar, are a delight, and potatoes are offered in eight guises. A pecan-topped sweet potato casserole, although delicious, would be better as dessert. Non-beef-eaters can choose from numerous luxurious seafood dishes, a cheese-stuffed chicken breast, grilled Portobello mushrooms, and six salads. Award-winning wine list is steep but serious, with an average bottle price of \$70 but reasonable markups and wines over \$100 offered at retail price. The main room harbors a fabulous view of the ocean if you arrive before sunset, but it's noisy — tables upstairs are quieter. Dinner nightly; lunch Fridays only. In the Beginning

Malick keeps the Seventies alive like no one else.

verything I knew about Captain John Smith and Pocahontas, I learned from Miss Peggy Lee: "When her daddy tried to kill him,/ She said, 'Daddy, oh, don't you dare./ He gives me fever.'" (Name that tune.)

But now along comes Terrence Malick in *The New World* to broaden my knowledge with a two-and-a-half-hour


history lesson of fact and speculation, revising my mental image mainly by widening the picture frame, reminding me, if I was ever aware, of the Indian maid's marriage to another, John Rolfe, and of her intended sojourn in England which became instead her eternal rest. Malick's account, after all, is not a love story, or not just ("Love - shall we deny it when it visits us?"), but rather a vision of utopian idealism ("I shall make a new start, a fresh beginning") and the ineluctable progress of America from its native innocence ("They are gentle, loving, faithful, lacking in all guile or trickery") to its imported corruption ("Lord, they're gone away from You, they have not hearkened to Your voice").

No one could deny that Malick has a vision, or at the very least a favorite

shot: a solitary person (usually Colin Farrell, his blue-black eyebrows squirming like indigo snakes to meet in the middle of his forehead) adrift in a sea of tall grass or grain, engulfed by nature, enraptured in a state of child-


like wonder, wandering around confusedly as if trying to remember where he might have might bioscript Large

mislaid his script. Large chunks of the words in a very sparse screenplay have been dubbed onto the soundtrack later, in murmurous, barely audible voice-overs from more than one narrator. (Most, if not all, of the parenthetical quotations above come from these first-person ruminations.) The employment of multiple narrators is of course a modernist storytelling device which Malick seized upon in The Thin Red Line — an advance on the solo, subliterate female narrators of his Badlands and Days of Heavenand it sounds all the more anachronistic, all the more pretentious, in a setting of the early 17th Century than in one of the Second World War. Perhaps his tight hold on that handme-down crutch would help to explain how he was able to speed this project to completion a mere seven years after



his previous project, in stark contrast to the twenty-year hiatus prior to that one. After all this time, he still has fire on the brain: it wouldn't be a Malick film without a conflagration or two. Some of the water shots are almost worthy of Tarkovsky, though the sunlight strained through treetops another favorite Malick shot — is an art-film cliché, unworthy of anybody. And don't let the budget fool you. (The excellent set of the frontier fort must have cost a mint by itself.) This is a bona fide art film, one whose jump cuts — very tiny jumps — cannot juice up its stagnant pace, one whose integrity is declared most clearly in its ineptitude. It's too earnest, it seems to say, The New World

to be bothered with entertainment. Malick keeps the Seventies alive like no one else: the dream of rapprochement between commercialism and art, or at any rate the revolutionist scheme of infiltrating the first with the second. That Rip Van Winkle slumber of twenty years, post-*Days of Heaven*, may have had a lot to do with keep-

ing that dream alive.

For me, the biggest excitement of the film - the biggest throwback to the Good Old Days, better and older than the Seventies, even - was the single corporate logo at the start of it: that of New Line. (By comparison, The Matador, not atypically these days, started with five!) From there, however, it was all downhill, nothing precipitous, just an endless, gentle, fifteen-degree grade, a potent stimulant to drowsiness. I have read that Malick has trimmed some seventeen minutes from the running time since I sat through it, not to mention since it opened in select markets for Oscar consideration, thus abridging the history lesson to two hours and a quarter. I can neither confirm these excisions first-hand nor gauge their effect. (Whole scenes of several minutes each? Or just another couple of hundred jump cuts?) A similar tinkering after initial release, and after pre-release press screenings, worked for Kubrick with 2001. Mavbe

that would account for some of the tempered critical response to the film in 1968. And maybe I should similarly have waited to see The New World till Malick was through tinkering on it. Then again, maybe whatever he took out will get put back anyway for the DVD release. I won't be sitting through it again. No maybe about it.

Transamerica amounts to a conventional road movie and male-bonding movie despite the unconventional natures of the fellow travellers, a druggy street hustler en route to Hollywood for a career in gay porn, and a pre-op transsexual, a week away from his "reassignment" surgery, who his young companion does not at first realize is a man, much less realize is his — the companion's - long-lost father. It boasts a flat tire of a script, or anyhow a low-on-air tire (from first-time writer and director Duncan Tucker), but also a fascinating, disorienting performance by Felicity Huffman in a gender-blurring no-man's-land, moving as if she were balancing a jug of water on her head, talking in a tranquilized monotone, stiffening her face into a fragile mask, generally acting like she has a gun at her back, all very understandable for someone who lives in breathless dread

of being found out.

Tristan and Isolde gets printed out on screen as Tristan + Isolde, the way a jackknife might put it on a park bench. In it, Kevin Reynolds, the director of Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves and Waterworld, tries to rescue the legendary lovers from the clutches of Wagner and deliver them to the shopping mall. Deliver them, more exactly, to mushy, muddled action scenes, to dull, gray, lightless photography, to moonfaced, crêpe-flat closeups, to a Johnny Depp manqué (James Franco), a Kate Winslet wisp (Sophia Myles), and a glowering supporting cast of envious no-accounts. It's bearable, nevertheless, just for the story and its modifications. Such is the power of myth.

Hoodwinked is a fractured fairy tale, the Red Riding Hood tale, told in a fractured narrative after the fashion of stuff like Pulp Fiction, Go, Snatch, Sin City, with a dash of Rashomon, a whisper of Citizen Kane. The intersections of four narrative lines, from four differing points of view, are fun to spot; and the minor character of a banjo-picking bluegrass billy goat, who can say hardly anything without singing it, is truly funny. The bottomdrawer computer animation sets a useful low standard, a base baseline, against which to measure the qualitycontrolled slickness of Disney or DreamWorks: the nearest thing today to a George Pal Puppetoon in arthritic rigidity. Co-writers and directors Cory Edwards, Todd Edwards, and Tony Leech can fully match the big boys, though, in shoot-from-the-hip hipness. If that's what you want from your fairy tales.

Match Point and Looking for Comedy in the Muslim World, the Woody Allen and Albert Brooks movies, respectively, that I had mentioned were at the top of my Christmas Wish List, arrive simultaneously this Friday by some quirk of fate, stroke of irony, or dirty trick. To talk about them together, once I've had a chance to collect my thoughts, seems to be the thing to do. In the meantime I can recommend them highly and highlier. Respectively.

Aeon Flux — The live-action adaptation of an MTV cartoon remains so cartoonish - what with its computer-gen erated futuristic utopia, computer-animated internal organs, computer-manipu-lated stunts and body doubles, computer this and computer that — it's a wonder it bothered with flesh-and-blood actors at all. Charlize Theron, who may have been worried after Monster and North Country that you were beginning to view her as a frump, demonstrates that she can be as sleekly dehumanized as Kate Beckinsale in Underworld or Halle Berry in Catwoman. ("I want to know what it feels like to be a person." she says at one point, a tad disingenuously.) Frances McDormand, who played opposite Theron in North Country, cannot be dehumanized to quite that extent, but she can at any rate be given a monstrous Pre-Raphaelite hairdo. Director Karyn Kusama, once upon a time the maker of the gritty little Girlfight, might have persuaded herself she was still carrying the flag of feminist empowerment, but she could not very well persuade the rest of us unless maybe the computer was named HALLE 9000. 

neither"), a love that would survive each man's marriage and fatherhood, over a pe riod approaching two decades, but a love that could never come down from the mountain where it sprang up: "This is a goddam bitch of an unsatisfactory situation." Though the story was quite presciently written before the murder of Matthew Shepard in that same territory, the movie arrives long after that, and with a clearer, cruder sense about it of payback, of axe-grinding, of remedial education. There is also a sense about it of material stretched too thin, a slow, uneventful, time-biding start, working up stealthily to the moment of maximal male bonding, and then a straightforward, chronological, but timeskipping follow-through. The greater detail and delay on screen, as against the page, do not equate to greater credibility. One credible detail: the horseplay that turns rough on the eve of their first parting, the eloquent expression of nonverbal types. Contrastingly, their first reunion, a clinch of sumo wrestler ferocity, right under the nose of one of the wives, is miles from credible. Jake Gyllenhaal, with his choirboyish pretty face and lofty voice, is the more acceptably typecast of the two. But Heath Ledger, lowering his voice to a Scott Glenn register, inside a clamped jaw, and suppressing his native Aussie accent, conveys the more poignant image of inhibition and concealment. Both actors look good in their jeans, in their hats, on their horses, and with their Marlboro Man smokes. And the volup tuous landscape is lovingly photographed. Director Ang Lee already did a lot of that in Ride with the Devil, and did it, at the time, with more impact of surprise and revelation. (Ang Lee? Man of action?) What's new here feels frankly inevitable, not at all revelatory; and the director of The Wedding Banquet, Sense and Sensibility, and The Ice Storm seems an unsurprising man for the job. Capote — Truman Capote, that is, during the six years it took to research and write his "nonfiction novel," In Cold Blood, Regardless of how true a story, it is truly a good story, whose claim on our attention is not that it's factual but that it's fascinating. It is the story, at bottom, of an artist at work; a writer in pursuit of a subject; an es tablished novelist, a Manhattan dandy transplanted from the Deep South, who, for reasons unclear, clips out an item from The New York Times of November 15, 1959, about the massacre of a family in rural Kansas, and who promptly gets the goahead from the editor at The New Yorker to hop a train to the scene of the crime. The story, then, of an exotic fruit in the Mid-west breadbasket, with his nasally lisping castrato drawl and his ankle-length camel's-hair coat and flowing boa-like scarf. ("Bergdorf's," he volunteers, fingering the scarf under the inquisitive gaze of an agent from the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, who, tugging on his hat brim when taking his leave, says in turn, "Sears Roebuck.") The story of a man who, in the end, fits his chosen title as well as either the murderers or their executioners. It is not a story with a moral to it, although some viewers will feel compelled, for their own comfort, to draw one; it is simply, and complicatedly, the story of an artist at work. In its general outline - what price art? - it may be a bit old-hat; in its particulars it is like-new. Philip Seymour Hoffman, even after you have gotten over the initial funniness of his celebrity impersonation, serves as our constant reminder to take the story with a grain of salt, to put quotation marks around the name of Capote. His whole-souled commitment to the part, his concentration, his emotion, his expressiveness, his nuance, his multiplicity - all of that helps to make a good story better. Whether or not truer. the Witch, and the Wardrobe — The mythic children's book by C.S. Lewis makes for a good children's film, better, to pick a couple of nearby co-ordinates, than any of the Harry Potters, better than any third of The Lord of the Rings, albeit still rather longish at two hours and twenty minutes. In the first place, and in spite of the existence of six other books in the Narnia series, it has a beginning, a middle, and an end - and all in one film! (What a concept!) In that respect, it calls to mind the original Star Wars, not the original trilogy, much less the following trilogy, but the single, solitary film. The stand-alone film. The ending of Narnia in particular, with all its triumphal pomp and circumstance, calls that film to mind. The beginning, on the other hand, calls to mind an even better children's film, The Secret Garden (the 1993 version at any rate), with four parentless children packed off during the London Blitz to a gloomy mansion of rigid rules ("No improper use of the dumbwaiter," etc.), where they soon discover, at the back of the wardrobe in the spare room, a portal to the alternative universe of Narnia, populated by talking animals and a messianic lion named Aslan. (The transitions between the two worlds are dreamily seamless.) A prophecy, they further discover, has foretold of their coming as well as their overthrow of the reigning Wicked White Witch, wonderfully visualized - an icicle crown. frozen-stiff hair, snowman's lump-of-coal eves, clammy, oystery skin - and commandingly played by Tilda Swinton. The

narrative incidents unfold smoothly and swiftly and at times quite excitingly. And the execution of Aslan, in an atmosphere that reeks of a witches' Sabbath, is about as brutal as it could be without becoming as sadistic as The Passion of the Christ. His immediate resurrection, although the logic of it had been withheld from us, and although the Christian allegory of it cannot be ignored, is nevertheless easier to swallow than, subsequently, the prowess of the children on the battlefield or the wholesale resurrection of casualties on that field. The lesson in courage at that point, or those points, gets a bit muddied. It almost smacks of cowardice. 

Good Night, and Good Luck — Unabashed hero worship of the "crusading" CBS newsman Edward R. Murrow, directed and co-written by George Clooney, who also plays Murrow's television producer, Fred Friendly. (In the lead role, David Strathairn has Murrow's somber countenance, speaks with his cadence, and goes through a full carton of his coffin nails.) Framed by a literal "Salute to Edward R. Murrow" in 1958, and by the guest-ofhonor's scolding assessment of the current state of TV journalism, it centers on his famous face-off four years earlier with Sen. Joe McCarthy, now known in ever

widening circles as the Boogeyman. (Mc-Carthy, seen only in grainy archive footage, looks even cruder than usual in opposition to the crisply photographed thespian smoothies.) Clooney, son of a TV newscaster himself, and high-profile Hollywood liberal, would no doubt be pleased if the sitting duck of the past were taken to be a stand-in for the fluttery fowl of today Rush Limbaugh, Oliver North, and Co., the religious right, Karl Rove, take your pick and pleased, too, if Murrow's example were held up to the news networks of half a century later. (But be careful, George, what you wish for: the network that appears to come closest to Murrow's stance of advocacy, if nowhere near his humanity or integrity, would be Fox.) Clooney can surely rival any of his targeted enemies, past or present, in piety; and even, albeit in a somewhat different sense, in reactionary ism: taking up the social-conscious subject matter of the Lumet-Ritt-Frankenheimer generation (he had already done so in his live-television experiment of *Fail-Safe* a few years back), setting it in the precise period of their salad days, shooting it in blackand-white (not just matching the custom of the time, but Expressionistically matching the Weltanschauung of white hats versus black hats), scoring it with outmoded moody jazz, and treating it in the hectoring, lecturing style of the Rose-Serling-Schulberg screenwriters. In truth the message is gotten across with an altogether unacceptable amount of speechifying; and for all the feverishly overlapping dialogue and the occasional hustle-bustle of cast or camera, it is steadfastly a static film, nailed to a platform. Harry Potter and the Goblet of

Fire — The fourth installment in J.K. Rowling's series of children's books vields a two-and-a-half-hour movie which for all its furious activity, gets virtually nowhere. It gets, more specifically, through the "legendary" Triwizard Tournament, only to arrive at the dampening admonition, "Dark and difficult times lie ahead." Potterites, under the freedom-of-religion pact, ought not to be begrudged their mythology; and two and a half hours of lavish illustration might well strike their eyes as a feast. The skeptic or the mere apathetic is more apt to notice the presumptuousness of filmmakers who expect their audience to meet them seven-eighths of the way. (Have you done your homework, kiddies?) The skeptic or apathetic will also be quicker to sense that the unabated spectacle of special effects becomes almost routine, almost humdrum, regardless of how imaginative some of those effects may be: the sailing ship that surfaces and submerges like a submarine, the ghostly face of Sirius molded in the glowing embers of the hearth for a fireside chat. Such a viewer will also be more prone to argue that this sort of anythinggoes fantasy, with few established rules, fosters a feeling of passiveness if not instinctive, involuntary withdrawal. The new director, Mike Newell, is the best of the three to take the controls in the series to date (Chris Columbus for parts one and two, Alfonso Cuarón for part three), although a runaway train is open only to the most limited guidance. We are reminded of his capabilities not so much by any demonstration of them as by the presence of Miranda Richardson, his scintillating star in Dance with a Stranger, and quite delightful here in the new role of Rita Skeeter, nosy news reporter for the animated scandal sheet, The Daily Profit, With Daniel Radcliffe, Rupert Grint, Emma Watson, Brendan Gleeson, Michael Gambon, Ralph Fiennes. 2005.


King Kong — Fresh from The Lord of the Rings, Peter Jackson could presumably have done anything he wanted. What he apparently wanted was to do a remake. Check that, a second remake. A 21st-century Kong. A CGI Kong. A kung-fu Kong. (Three T. rexes at a time, one hand tied up with a savory maiden.) And not least, a three-hour Kong, even though it takes over an hour to get to him, and though he must share screen time after that with an entire ecosystem of slimy, slithery critters. Jackson, remaking almost slavishly the 1933 version rather than the rerouted 1976 version, returns the action to the original period, plays up and jokes up, with help from the turtle-faced Jack Black, the film-withinthe-film element (Fay Wray is unavailable because "she's shooting a picture with RKO"), and imbues the beauty-and-beast theme with the sort of modish, operatic amplification that says so much about our Age of Indulgence, squeezing every last drop of emotion from the death of the ape, all the way down to the emotion (among the most sensitive individuals) of mirth. The Kong films show a sharp decline, this one a farther step down from the last than the last was down from the first. Three hours are not automatically "better" than one and three-quarters or two and one

quarter. Even the supposed progress in special effects - from stop-motion models to computer animation — is largely illusory. The former falsity of stiffness and creakiness has simply been replaced by the falsity of fluidness and facileness. Exhibit A: the stampede of brontosauruses, an enlarged replication of the running of the bulls at Pamplona, wherein these nimble, fleetfooted behemoths scarcely seem to occupy the same space as the humans, even when stepping on them. Exhibit B: the attack of the giant bats on Kong, flittering like shadows and creating a timely diversion that affords the boring romantic couple (Naomi Watts, Adrien Brody) a means of escape by hang-gliding from a bat's feet, easy as catching a ride on the trolley. Last Holiday - The old, old - fifty-sixyear-old, to be exact - Alec Guinness vehicle retailored to the expansive personality and physique of Oueen Latifah. As a mousy cookware clerk at a department store in New Orleans, given three weeks to live and determined to blow her bank account on a dream vacation at the Grandhotel Pupp (pronounced "Poop") in Karlovy Vary, the actress shows a bit more than her usual capital-A attitude — a reserve, a restraint, a wider range. That's hard to sustain, though, when she's doing things like snowboarding down a "black diamond" ski slope or BASE-jumping from the top of a hydroelectric dam. You go, girl. She is flatteringly photographed in the bargain, although the lighting that gives her (and a nonthreatening LL Cool J) a golden glow, gives the white folks jaundice and anemia. One of those is the pre-eminent French actor of his generation, Gerard Depardieu, in a subordinate role as the hotel master chef who holds the secret of life: "Butter." Which is tantamount to seeing a French comedy starring Firmine Richard wherein Robert De Niro would pop up intermittently, speaking broken subtitled French as a philosophical hotdog vendor. Wayne

"A story like mine," she starts out, meaning more than she means, "should never be told." (The catty rivalry on screen between the older actress and the younger, and eventually the all-out catfight, gains an added dimension when you recall that the one was bumped by the other in the films and affections of Zhang Yimou, or Yimou Zhang.) Using Chinese actresses is of course defensible in a movie aimed at the American masses, just as their speaking in English is defensible. Pride and Prejudice — By this time the Jane Austen novel qualifies as a repertory piece, a mettle-test for would-be Darcys and Elizabeth Bennets, little different from Romeo and Juliet. The team behind the present production of it, apart from their attempt to replace the titular conjunction with a dashing ampersand, earn no points for imagination or courage in finding their way to so trafficky a corner of the library. (Can no one, for a change, find his way to the shelf of Thomas Love Peacock? George Meredith?) And the prospect of again sitting through the machinations of the author's mating game (match four from Column A to four from Column B) sounds quite tedious in advance. Nevertheless, the filmmakers have not failed to make it involving. Austen herself made it hard for them to fail, as long as they stuck close to the text. Joe Wright, a British TV director in his feature debut, certainly did more than his share to gum up the works, with an anemic, coarse-grained image and a lot of mushy telephoto camerawork: a pale substitute for the MGM sheen of 1940. And Matthew MacFadyen makes a dull Darcy, a blank, more stuporous than brooding, a kind of waxwork Stan Laurel. Any doubts, however, as to the star potential of Keira Knightley — and after the likes of Domino and The Jacket and King Arthur, how could there not have been doubts? - are decisively routed. She may be too pretty for

The Souid and the Whale - Complex relationship film. Parents and children, husband and wife, brother and brother, in the main, but supplementarily wife and lover, male professor and female student, older boy and new girlfriend, among others. The uncommon specificity as to time and place and cultural milieu - 1986, Brooklyn, the bourgeois intelligentsia — is to some extent a limiting factor but more so an animating factor. These people live and breathe. (Or, in view of the time, lived and breathed.) The parents, the husband and wife, are respectively a has-been "serious" novelist, now a musty academic, and a

soon-to-be first novelist, presently excerpted in The New Yorker, and to make matters worse the wife's wing-spreading encompasses an occasional affair. When the couple try a joint-custody separation, the older boy sides with his aggrieved father, while the younger boy, barely into puberty, sides with his mother. Though well played by the sagely bearded Jeff Daniels, with his outer show of cultivation and his undertow of savagery, the character of the father is seen as a bit of a caricature; and though likewise well played by the cosmetic-free Laura Linney, the mother is seen more distantly, less distinctly. But the characters of the children are unqualified successes, especially the older one, whose age, by no mere coincidence, closely matches that of writerdirector Noah Baumbach at that same period. The hunched shoulders, the sniffy nose, the sleepy eyes, the shrugging speech of Jesse Eisenberg capture perfectly the role-playing pretentiousness of the young, and the damning details of intellectual laziness all throughout the script complete the portrait. The younger brother, played under a cloud of moroseness (with passing squalls) by Owen Kline, registers as a total original, a self-proclaimed philistine, after careful consideration of Dad's disdainful definition ("Someone who doesn't care about books or interesting films"), and no less pretentious, in his inverted snobbery, than his faux-cultured older brother. This painfully funny film, put simply, is a comedy of character, a human comedy. And while the filmmaking itself is nothing special, the not too jiggly hand-held camera does achieve, in its positioning and its movement, a sort of natural rapport with the humans, an easy congeniality, a

Syriana — Serioso. Molto serioso. Not so much a drama as a diagram, didactic in purpose, of the chain-link interconnections, the slow-burn chain reactions, in the Middle Eastern oil trade. What screenwriter Stephen Gaghan did for the illicit drug business in Traffic, he attempts to do again, as both screenwriter and first-time director, for the even more intricate oil business, adopting some of the same "realistic" conventions (the unsteady camera, the intermittent subtitles, the egalitarian cast of characters, a lack of dramatic emphasis, an absence of heroics), and following the same pattern of crosscutting between plotlines in an apparently deliberate strategy of suspensus interruptus. 2046 — After the concentrated perfection of "The Hand" — Wong Kar-wai's fraction of the anthology film, Eros - the defects of this one are apt to appear the more glaring. Ostensibly it's a sequel to his close-to-per-

fection In the Mood for Love. Or anyhow the action picks up shortly after it in 1966, and centers around the same protagonist (Tony Leung), although the love-'em-andleave-'em libertine and spicy science-fiction writer of the current film bears little resemblance to the inhibited piner and Grub Street drudge of its predecessor, even allowing for the ravages of a broken heart. (The title refers both to the time-setting of his s-f tales and to the number of his next-door hotel room.) There is a patchwork feeling here, jammed and jumbled, diffuse and desultory, partly the effect of a fragmented narrative and a heavy dependence on the

cement of voice-over, and partly the effect of a visual grab-bag that includes a lot of slow-motion, a bit of black-and-white, and extended re-enactments of the hero's visions of the future, sometimes animated, sometimes live-action, always in an illustrational style that postdates the science fiction of the mid-Sixties. The director's painterly eye ensures, at the same time, a great deal of beauty; and the wide, wide screen affords him more room than ever before for empty space, out-of-focus space, purely compositional and coloristic space. This thing of beauty, though, is rather a scatterbrained beauty, a gorgeous space

case. Some hefty ideas, to do with impermanence, loss, memory, alienation, are lugged up and down the arduous stair-step structure: we skip quickly past the charac-ters played by Gong Li, Carina Lau, and Faye Wong, before we spend some quality time with Zhang Ziyi, and begin to work our way back, in reverse order, to Faye Wong (still going forward in chronology) and then (withdrawing into the past) Carina Lau and Gong Li. With small overlaps, the scheme goes more or less A-B-C-D-C-B-A. We can almost perceive that the top step — the peak of the pyramid — the Zhang Ziyi piece — might have attained the independent perfection of "The Hand," if held to similar length. The lower steps are stubbier, and slipperier. LEAD STORY

 Bangkok economics student Panupol Sujjayakorn interrupted his studies in November to defend his World Scrabble Championship in London, one of many non-English-speaking competitors who achieved top-of-the-line ranking by memorizing up to 100,000 words in English without ever knowing their meanings. Like the others, reported the Chronicle of Higher Education, Mr. Panupol learned first those premium words that overuse the prominent Scrabble letter tiles (such as "aureolae"). (Alas, this time around, a native English speaker, Dr. Adam Logan, a number theory researcher, won the title, building actual words like "qanat" and "euripi.")

Cliches Come to Life

Scientists at Syracuse University, recently describing for a British journal their study of body measurements of bats, found an inverse size relationship between a male bat's brain and testicles. The researchers hypothesized that both sperm and brains are metabolically costly to produce, and in species with relatively stable monogamous relationships, brains are allowed to grow, but where females are promiscuous, males that do not overdevelop testicles get left out of the race to procreate.

(1) In November in Murfreesboro, Tenn., U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs bureaucrats Joseph Havmond and Natalie Coker were charged with taking kickbacks from suppliers on government purchases of 100,000 rolls of red tape. (The tape is distinctive, red "security" tape used on packages of VA pharmaceuticals.) (2) According to a November Washington Post profile of federal examiner Russell Stormer, the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office has, since 1790, granted about 30,000 patents to people who have imagined unique ways to reinvent the wheel (or at least improve upon it).

Ironies

Most Convenient Ambulance Chase: In November, according to an Indianapolis Star report of a local accident, an SUV driver collided with another car, causing the SUV to crash into

an office building, partially smashing through a wall. Among the building's tenants: the personalinjury law firm Mitchell Hurst Jacobs & Dick, which specializes in automobile accidents.

Mr. Ravfran das Neves Sales was convicted in Belem, Brazil, in December of the widely reported murder of an American nun, a rain-forest activist who was gunned down as she argued with Sales over who owned the land he was working. Sales claimed self-defense in that, according to him, the nun reached into her bag as she was proclaiming that "the weapon I have [for fighting for preservation of the rain forest] is this," and Sales, sensing that she was about to pull a gun, shot her. The nun's "weapon," was her copy of the Bible.

Can't Possibly Be True

- After trying for 22 years to get Hattie Siegel, now 83, to mow her lawn and clear the other critter-infested vegetation from her yard according to regulations of the village of Tequesta, Fla., officials finally cracked down on the accumulated \$1.8 million in fines they had levied, and in December, a bankruptcy court ruled that she must liquidate her estate to pay the tab. Two other properties of hers were sold, and she stands to lose more (everything except the Tequesta house itself, which is protected by state law). However, Siegel has finally sought help in the matter and plans to challenge the constitutionality of the village's fines.

 A bold weight-loss program of the Life of Life Healing Spa in Hong Kong involves actually setting fire briefly to the parts of the body holding the most fat, according to a December dispatch in London's Daily Telegraph. According to owner Karen Chu, the fire follows an energy flow "reading," full-body exfoliation, high-pressure hose spray, and herb-and-potion and alcohol rub-downs (but wet towels and a fire extinguisher are at the ready in case of problems). Chu said about 100 clients have undergone the treatment, with no complications, and the ones interviewed by the Daily Telegraph reporter praised the service. Chu said the treatment is based on traditional Chinese medicine, but a Hong Kong doctor interviewed by Agence France-Presse said, "I have never heard of such a thing."

Inexplicable

The land developer Bigg Homes, creator of the Eagle Mountain community near Salt Lake City, touted in its online promotional materials the fact that the development's "black race population percentage [is] significantly below state average." After hearing complaints, Bigg coowner David Adams removed the phrase in November, blaming the agency that designed Bigg's materials. (Whoever wrote the phrase must have thought that Utah's "state average" of 1.3 blacks per 100 was somehow suffocating.)

Unclear on the Concept

 In September, based on the complaint of only one letter-writer (and that man later said he was being provocative more than complaining), the band director of C.D. Hylton High School in Prince William County, Va., dropped from his playlist the popular Charlie Daniels Band song, The Devil Went Down to Georgia" because it centers on Satan. Daniels, interviewed by the Washington Post, was appalled: "I am a Christian, and I don't write pro-devil songs.'

Yee-Hah!

- Sidney Hale, 31, was arrested in Bluefield, Va., in November after enlisting a female friend to help him to, as he put it, sharpen his reflexes in case an intruder broke into his trailer home. The woman was to knock at the front door, and Hale was then to quickly grab his handgun. (A third person was to gauge Hale's reaction time.) According to a sheriff's detective, she knocked and Hale grabbed the gun. However, it accidentally fired a slug through the door into the woman's back (but she is fine following surgery). ... In December in Lake Worth, Fla., a 16-yearold boy found a .45-caliber bullet, began pounding it with a hammer and screwdriver, and shot himself in the stomach. He was treated and released at a hospital.

Hapless Criminals

- (1) Francisco Torres, 52, wanted for murder in New York City, was arrested at Lincoln Hospi-

tal in November after he checked in at the emergency room. According to police, he had suffered a severe asthma attack apparently triggered by the gunpowder residue from the bullet he fired at his victim. (2) Former Miami police officer Jesus Gutierrez, 35, charged with having sex with an underage girl, was initially offered a plea bargain that would have meant probation and no jail time, but he decided to go to trial. In September, he was convicted, and in December, a judge sentenced him to 20 years in prison.

Recurring Themes

- Guilty Despite Deformity: In November, engineering student Mischa Beutling, 22, became the most recent rape defendant to profess innocence by impossibility, arguing that his penis is simply too large to have committed the crime. Beutling, who stands 6' 7" and weighs 240 pounds, called a urologist to the stand in Newmarket, Ontario, to testify that Beutling's penis is 8 1/2 inches long "semi-relaxed" and 6 1/2 inches in circumference and that a woman who has not given birth could not accommodate it without serious injury. (In December, a judge named Margaret Eberhard found Beutling guilty.)

Undignified Deaths

- Same Gun? Same Bullet!: In November, in Brooklyn, N.Y., Jon Shuler, 20, aiming to settle an argument with Kenny Berry, 27, over a small amount of money, got a gun and shot Berry. Seriously wounded, Berry struggled for the gun, wrested it from Shuler, and shot him dead, just before Berry himself collapsed and died. ... In November, in Sun City, Calif., an 84year-old man put a gun to his head after a quarrel with his wife and killed himself. However, according to sheriff's deputies, the woman, 71, standing about eight feet away, was also killed when the bullet passed through him and into her forehead.





ONCE UPON A TIME

I was a little girl dancing in the summer sun with no shirt on, surrounded by pansies and mint, flower boxes, hanging plants, garden tools, and mud boots. My collection of toys included potpie tins, shovels, buckets, flowers, grass, leaves, and cicada shells. I would make mud pies and decorate them with flower petals and grass. I would collect cicada shells and keep them in old Velveeta boxes; I would see how many I could find in the week I visited with my grandparents.

I stood by my grandmother's side at the kitchen counter, and she would hand me peeled, raw turnips to munch on while she fried chicken, mashed potatoes, cooked green beans in bacon, and we chatted away. I learned how to make the best gravy in the world from her, watching her with the same admiration with which I would watch my mother put on her make-up before she would leave for a night on the town. My grandmother was my idol when it came to cooking Southern food. I love to cook all kinds of food, but my favorite, most comforting way to cook is the way she used to cook. Salads and potatoes from her garden, beef from a cow in the field, jellies from the pantry canned a year or two earlier, same with the green beans, the dates written on masking tape stuck on the side of the jar.

I remember feeling privileged when my grandmother would instruct me to go down to the deep freeze and find ice

cream for the apple pie she had made earlier that morning. I told her how delicious her cooking was to me, and she would tell me that was why she did it, because she knew I loved it so much.

I was a city mouse in the country when I visited my grandmother. I remember lazing on the porch swing in the peak heat of day and tempting a barn cat to sit with me. With a saucer of milk I worked on one cat for the duration of my visit — I would name it, feed it, pet it, and chase it. I had for those brief times, no worries; I was allowed to be a little girl, a free little nature girl. I would wear a flower behind my ear and have dirt under my fingernails. I was okay at my grandma's house in the summertime: I was okav.

My grandmother converted from Mennonite to Catholicism in order to marry my German grandfather, my tall, dark, strongwilled, mysterious grandfather. I loved my grandparents' calm, steadfast way of life. They showed me how to live happily and contentedly within one's means. They showed me what it was like to have a family stand by you, no matter what. I got to feel what it would be like to have a support system so strong that no matter what crime you had committed or disease you had contracted, you would always be taken care of. This was the life my



father came from.

My father was a Vietnam vet with a temper and a propensity to get screwed up and locked up. My grandparents were always there for him. They were even there for him when I told them he had seduced me during my childhood. For years my father would sexualize our weekends together by dressing me up in furs and diamonds, taking me to fancy restaurants, and keeping me up all night to play. But he was my daddy, my one and only, my love.

I will always love my grandparents, and I miss them. I miss the family gatherings, the Christmases, the weddings, and even the funerals. I miss these times because I brought the truth out. I gave a voice to the whispers, to the best-kept family secret, which wasn't Grandmother's apple-pie recipe. I long for my grandmother. I wish I could learn more from her. I wish I could tell her how much she meant to me, how much she will always mean to me. But I can't forgive her for taking my dad's side and not mine.

When, exactly, did I begin thinking of this place as home?

It is Friday the 13th in the a.m. as I write this. (I always want to follow sentences like that with something like," ... time is running out. Within moments they will be upon me.") There is your Friday angle, anyway. It is Friday now.

I have not been out of town for an embarrassingly long time. Recently I decided it was time to visit a friend in Berkeley whom I hadn't seen in ages and booked a flight. I discovered what late-night talk-show hosts have been riffing about since 9/11 and the shoe bomber — airport security. With a pacemaker preventing me from walking through metal detectors, this becomes even more of a deal and somewhat more personal. I wonder how many times these security guys hear cracks about buying a passenger dinner before the body search. By now it must be hilarious.


Going to a drizzly and cool city with great bookstores was a pleasure tempered by my friend's ill health and old age. My old age, not his. Walking around Berkeley, hitting bookstores with a backpack and a wad of cash is a dream I've nurtured for decades, but the dream never included wheezing. It never included seeing roving gangs of Westernized East Indian or Pakistani lesbians with chopped hair and big butts in denim either, and that was an amusing feature. If it occurred to me that here was a particular brutalization of female beauty, it could only add fuel to the argument of those who consider me a pig. Whatever.

At one bookshop on Shattuck Avenue I had the maybe thin (maybe, some might say, pathetic) but real gratification of finding a bookseller who knew me by name and produced one of my old books from a dusty pile of pulp in the basement. He also handed me an envelope, which contained an original typescript: the first page of a poem from Clark Ashton Smith, dated, I think, 1932. In the upper right-hand corner Smith had typed something like, "For your usual rate," and I noticed his typewriter ribbon had needed changing. This was a little thrill hard to describe. If I were ever to find myself writing this kind of florid stuff, I would immediately acknowledge it as the onset of Alzheimer's or something equally serious, and so it is difficult to defend the kind of affection that I have for it.

It occurred to me at some point my second day there that the old hippies on the sidewalks, with their beads and crafts and pretty much useless oddities for sale in front of them, might well be the same people I saw, with the same stuff, in 1969. The Robin Williams joke - or whoever it was - that goes, "If you remember the '60s, you weren't there," completely applies to my recollections of the place in 1969. I remember patchouli, Gorilla Records, and Blind Faith coming from open windows, it seemed, everywhere. In this aspect, it had changed only in details.

The area, around Shattuck and University, seemed to have undergone a large influx of Indian, Afghan, and Pakistani immigrants over the decades, and this certainly satisfied my dinner ambitions. I asked one very tall, young guy at a convenience store which was the best, reasonably-priced, Northern Indian food bet on the strip, and he plugged a vegetarian restaurant two doors down that had won several awards, but added, "If you must have meat, if for some reason you simply must have meat," (sounding like Peter Sellers), "then you can go across the street. They have meat. All the meat you want." He had suddenly made me insist upon chicken, and I had an absolutely great vindaloo take-out in the Travel Lodge room, eating with one hand while I read a novel by Steve Erickson. I subliminally enjoyed the fact that I needed to turn on the heat in the room and did not. "There is no wine so sweet as thirst," Omar Khayyám once observed.

I really did nothing remarkable but sort of mentally tapped my foot, telling myself, well, I'm out of town. It's not that I missed San Diego for any reason,



and I'm not sure it's possible anyway to miss anywhere in only 24 hours or so, but I wondered when, exactly, did I begin thinking of this place as home? It wasn't when I bought a house here or, in October of this year, observed that I have been living here for a quarter of a century — but it was probably only a few weeks earlier, in September, when my son, as grown man, came to live with me again. I called him. I called my girlfriend. I did not call my sister who lives in San Rafael, not far away. Or my other sister who also, I think, lives in San Rafael. I thought this was interesting, and I walked around the streets of downtown Berkeley that night remembering being 19 years old, broke and homeless, out of a band and rock and roll dreams, joining a black soul and blues group out of Oakland, playing military bases and not being happy.

At the airport, the guy at the Delta counter tried to persuade me to take a later flight, only an hour-and-a-half difference, and I'd get \$200 credit with the airline. I told him no, and I'm still not completely sure why.
