





Impure coincidence The timing



of termed-out San Diego assemblyman Juan Vargas, who's trying to unseat congressional incumbent Bob Filner in June's 51st District primary election. At the same moment in history, Los Angeles mayor Antonio Villaraigosa has



kicked off his attempt to take control of the L.A. Unified School District. But instead of asking L.A. voters to approve the change, a risky and expensive proposition at best, the mayor and his business allies have decided to take their case to the state legislature, where bills are often molded by

the highest bidders. Villaraigosa says he's the last best hope to reform L.A.'s troubled public schools; his critics say putting so much concentrated power into the mayor's hands without the oversight of the elected school board would be an invitation to rampant corruption. But merits aren't expected to figure much in the debate; instead, familiar contributors have already begun opening their checkbooks. Arrayed against the mayor is the state schoolteachers union. In Villaraigosa's corner are the city's major real estate interests, who count on him for a multitude of favors.

Enter Vargas, who could play a key role in making sure Villaraigosa's takeover bill slides through the Assembly. And, right on cue, the L.A. mayor's moneymen have begun to deliver funds to Vargas's until-recently bereft congressional campaign kitty. Leading the pack is Richard Meruelo, a well-heeled Cuban-American developer with homes in L.A. and Miami. Meruelo owns big chunks of L.A. real estate and is Villaraigosa's biggest backer, dumping more than \$190,000 into last year's mayoral campaign, most of it in the form of so-called independent expenditures that paid for phone banks, radio spots, and robocalls. Meruelo family members gave Villaraigosa another \$7000. In December, Meruelo gave his first \$1000 to Vargas. Then on March 23, Meruelo, along with his parents, Belinda and Homero, contributed another \$5000.

The Meruelo family is not without controversy. A decade ago, brother Homer Jr. was convicted of insurance fraud. And Meruelo himself has been engaged in an ugly showdown with the L.A. school board over a 23-acre parcel he owns that the school district wants for a high school. Earlier this month the board voted to condemn the land after Meruelo refused to sell and instead went to court, claiming the district didn't do a proper environmental review.

Other wealthy backers of Villaraigosa have also been giving to Vargas. On March 31, Eli Broad, the billionaire developer and insurance magnate, kicked in \$500. Closer to home, Arthur Bersin, the father of state secretary of education Alan Bersin - former chief of San Diego Uni-

fied, as well as a good friend and political ally of Broad's - gave \$1000 on March 5. Annie Malcolm, whose husband David did time in a work-furlough program for felony conflicts of interest arising from his tenure as a San Diego port commissioner, contributed \$600 on February 2.

Goes both ways The National Republican Congressional Committee has launched a barrage of negative TV spots against 50th Congressional District Democratic candidate Francine Busby in order to soften her up for June's runoff against ex-GOP congressman Brian Bilbray. The first of the ads asserts that Busby is beholden to special interests and features a background of rapidly passing names of Busby campaign donors, including that of Qualcomm chairman and founder Irwin Jacobs. As it turns out, Jacobs, a nominal Democrat, is also partial to the GOP when it comes to doling out campaign money. Besides letting the Republican National Committee have

free use of the Qualcomm corporate jet to the tune of \$17,488 over the past five years, federal campaign finance records show that Jacobs personally gives \$5000 a year to Qualcomm's Political Action Committee, which in turn has faithfully backed such GOP stalwarts

as congressmen Darrell Issa and Duncan Hunter, as well as the ousted Randy "Duke" Cunningham. The PAC's top

single donation, \$9000, went to San Bernardino GOP congressman Jerry Lewis, who's been plagued with his own share of ethics problems.

Hit the road By far the best-traveled member of San Diego County's congressional delegation is Darrell Issa, who ranks 24th among all House members on a list of taxpayer-paid travel compiled on Washington's PoliticalMoneyLine website. Since 2001, multimillionaire Issa has been to such places as Bahrain, Hungary, Israel, Saudi Arabia, the United Kingdom, Austria, Czech

and Ukraine. The total cost was \$78,639. By comparison, Issa's GOP colleague Duncan Hunter spent \$11,190 going to destinations that included Belgium, Italy, and the United Kingdom. The disgraced Randy "Duke" Cunningham

required just \$1091 on a

single trip to France and Germany in 2001. Democrat Bob Filner racked up \$10,711 traveling to places like Argentina, Brazil, Chile, and Panama as part of his duties for the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. Fellow Democrat Susan Davis spent \$6274 on trips to countries including Iraq and Uzbekistan.

The Fantasyland Budget

erry Sanders, the ex-police chief who became mayor, is already playing good cop/bad cop. He's the good cop, presenting

a "feel good" budget that doesn't hurt anybody or anybody's pocketbook but is based on a wholly unrealistic and dubious premise: that the City can - or should - sell pension obligation bonds.

If the fantasyland bonds don't eventuate, the rug comes out from under the "no pain" budget: there will have to be even more service and infrahave issued two budgets: one indicating what will happen without the \$640 million in pension obligation bonds (the crisis will crash down on the citizenry) and another indicating what will happen if by some miracle they are issued (the City will snort coke and forget about its problems for a while).

It's important to under-

term money, "But if you want money over two decades, you have to have financial statements," and they will be hard to get, no matter what boosters claim, says Diann Shipione, whose whistle-blowing brought the crisis to the fore. If the city floated debt to pay off the pension deficit, that would be satisfactory, but "if the proceeds were used to supplement the required annual contribution - or borrowing to make payments," then the troubles would intensify.

The same week the mayor released his Novocain budget, Aguirre issued a report that makes the bonds a long shot. Aguirre attacked the consulting firm of Kroll, Inc., suggesting it be booted out of town and pursued for dam-



structure spending cuts and almost certainly higher taxes and fees.

But the good cop can blame city attorney Mike Aguirre, who ruled last week that these bonds should go to the voters. This came on top of an attack on Kroll, Inc., which was hired to be an umpire but is acting more like a vampire. Good-bye, Sanders's painkiller. "People are sick and tired of the ludicrous pension benefits and will view it as their chance to vote against them," says Libertarian activist Richard Rider. If the people aren't permitted to vote on them, Rider — "along with half the people of San Diego," he sayswill file suit to place the bonds on the ballot.

An honest politician would

stand that pension obligation bonds are not like school bonds that add assets to the community or bridge bonds that are paid off with user tolls. Pension obligation bonds shift previous recklessness onto future generations, permitting current generations to avoid making tough decisions. It's like paying off credit card debt with another credit card.

Former councilmember Larry Stirling objects to "pension bonds that simply roll over the debt to the next generation without addressing the problems. The mayor says that the law allows him to 'leverage' some of the debt. Aren't such financial shenanigans what got us into trouble in the first place?"

The city could get short-

ages. It's about time.

The first consulting firm hired to study the pension mess, Vinson & Elkins, came up with a whitewash, as it had secretly told the City it would do. Vinson said government officials had broken no laws. The accounting firm of KPMG, hired to audit the 2003 books, would not accept the Vinson report.

Meanwhile, Aguirre came out with reports with evidence that city councilmembers had broken securities laws.

Kroll was hired to reconcile the two reports. And for continued on page 8

American Dreamers

icky Lin Yu-tzu gently removes her son's fingers from the laptop. Youxuan is 22 months old, but his tiny grasping hand is the

only distraction he has caused us. His mother and I are inspecting 3-D snake-limbed figures from the movie Sky Captain and the World of Tomorrow. Yu-tzu helped to create them. She works as a computer-generated graphics artist for the Walt Disney Company in Burbank. Her products are a far cry from the hand-drawn characters of early Disney animation.

Yu-tzu's husband Hock Wong takes the boy to the counter of the Kearny Mesa McDonald's, where we are sitting, to buy him French fries. Wong does animation work too, but on PlayStation products for the Sony Corporation in San Diego. Although their industries are different, Wong's animation work is similar to his wife's. They met several years ago while working on video games for the Japanese SNK Corporation in San Jose. Before that Yu-tzu had worked in Chicago and Oklahoma.

Both Yu-tzu and Wong came to the United States 11 years ago. Wong studied at the Academy of Art University in San Francisco before starting to work in animation."My original art medium in Taiwan was sculpture," says Yu-tzu. In 1994 she attended Georgia's Savannah College of Art and Design.

Today Wong, 34, and Yutzu, 36, own a home in Carmel Valley. But at each weekend's end Yu-tzu takes their son to an apartment she rents in Burbank. Youxuan goes to day care during his mother's working hours, and she cares for him at night. They return to San Diego on Saturday mornings.

Wong looks forward to the time he can be with his family every day. Both husband and wife enjoy their work and find it challenging. But the separation they endure for its sake is the most difficult aspect of their lives. They each know other artists who make similar sacrifices to work in the

field, some going back and forth periodically from Hollywood to San Francisco and cities as far away as New York. But unlike most of their

colleagues, Wong and Yu-tzu must navigate the additional problems of being immigrants. They are Chinese; he comes from Singapore, she from Taiago and is still waiting to receive it.

San Diego attorney Stephen Ure tells me that immigration services has a 5-year backlog of green-card requests. But low-skilled workers often wait longer than that, sometimes as long as 15 to 20 years. Today there is great agonizing about illegal immigration. According to Ure, however, if the length of the process were more reasonable for unskilled workers, the United States would have fewer immigration problems." If the legal way is going to take 20 years," he says, "there is no incentive for immigrants to do things

attorneys can usually do something to help them if they entered legally."

Wong and Yu-tzu did enter legally and are fortunate to have jobs that demand high skill levels. So their prospects are good. Their strong relationship also serves them well. In his work, Stephen Ure has discovered that marital and immigration problems often go together. American citizens who divorce their immigrant spouses subject them to deportation unless the immigrants' attempts to stay in the U.S. are based on something other than the marriage. And some vindictive spouses,

ever, comes anxiety for those who have played by all the rules but think about what might happen if they don't get their green cards soon. For Yu-tzu and Wong that would mean losing American careers in which they have risen steadily through hard work. "We've paid a lot of taxes too," says Wong. Before coming here both their families had warned that their interests might lead them to become "starving artists." Now their jobs pay well. Yu-tzu tells me that at Disney, salaries for permanent animation employees range between \$40,000 and \$100,000 per year plus

she is not interested in becoming a manager, even though that would mean more money. What Yu-tzu likes is the creative work. "It's the movie business," she tells me, "yet the work is tedious, not glamorous. At some companies the workday is ten hours. I'm luckier; I only sit in front of the computer eight hours a day. But it's a very interesting job, every day painting something different."

The way her animated creations develop, according to Yu-tzu, is that Disney's art department gives her drawings to use as models. From them she must create the com-



wan. Both are applying for

green cards, or permanent resident status. They now have work permits corresponding to their skill, education, and

experience. Sony sponsored the work permits of both Wong and Yu-tzu when the couple worked together for the company. But when Yu-tzu left to work for Disney two years ago, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services terminated her green-card application. She has started over under Disney sponsorship but is only in the beginning of the process. Wong applied for his green card four years right."

While waiting, immigrants may stay in the United States to work if employers obtain work permits for them. The permits are good for three years plus a three-year extension. After that, says Ure, immigration attorneys can usually obtain special permission to stay in the U.S. longer. Yu-tzu and Wong have retained an attorney to assist them.

What legal help immigrants can get once they are here is "all about their entry," says Ure. "There are very few avenues to stop them from being deported if they entered illegally. But immigration according to Ure, have threatened to keep the couple's children while getting their partners deported. At least abused women in marriages have some recourse. Under the federal Violence Against Women Act, such a woman often can file the "battered spouse petition" to stop deportation.

questionable reasons, Vinson was hired to do a second report. "Almost immediately, Kroll and [Vinson] began working

together," says Aguirre's report, even though Kroll had been hired to make an objective assessment of Vinson's work. Kroll workers sent lovey-dovey notes to former city manager Lamont Ewell. They included hate messages about Aguirre —

Ewell calling him the Antichrist, for just one example."Emails show that Kroll was working and colluding with members of the City Council supposed to be under investigation and with a city manager who was supposed to be under inves-

tigation," says Aguirre.

Kroll also stepped outside its mandate by lobbying the Union-Tribune, which responded by writing editorials in favor of more money for Kroll. The city council was billed for Kroll's seduction of the U-T. "There is a danger when a newspaper becomes actively involved as decisionmaker instead of passing information to readers," says Aguirre. "It's why the publication is losing subscriptions; it's not credible."

says Peter Q. Davis, former banker and mayoral candidate. "You don't get to skip a year; the main reason is that all the unknowns would be stuffed into this unaudited year, and these would come home to haunt you."

So here's the scorecard: Aguirre's report on Kroll is an exhaustive one, full of disquieting details of Kroll and its law firm fleecing the City of \$20 million in fees, going far beyond their mandate and colluding with people they were supposed to be investigating, among other things.

Sanders may try to ignore Aguirre's report on Kroll, but KPMG can't. Even if KPMG did come out with an audit for 2003 and other auditors issued ones for 2004 and 2005, bond counsel, bond insurance companies, debt rating agencies, underwriters, and potential bond buyers would cock an eyebrow at San Diego pension obligation bonds, particularly since the federal government is still probing the City for its bond financing sins. It's possible the Securities and Exchange Commission will complete its investigation of the City soon, but there are few signs the U.S. attorney's office is ready to wrap up its case. Aguirre's call for a vote on the bonds may doom them completely, especially since he said they are bad public policy.

Davis thinks such bonds are a good solution, although he warns, "The City is acting like it is getting credit cards in the mail and thus has no financial problem. Borrowing is a short-term solution." He also agrees that Kroll and its law firm are "milking the job."

Without the pension obligation bonds, "We go to crisis mode," Rider says. Bankruptcy would be one option he doesn't necessarily favor. Expenditure cuts would have to be deep.

"This is just another indication that we are truly insolvent," says Shipione. If the City borrows, it would probably continued on page 10



be at a very high rate, she says. Maybe it would be a junk bond rate. Then Sanders could blame another bad cop: interest rates.

"Generally, my philosophy on pension obligation bonds is not to encourage issuing debt to pay off existing debt," says Councilmember Donna Frye. Like many, she has other questions about the Sanders budget: why, for example, do sales tax revenues soar 63 percent in fiscal 2007 and property tax incomes rise 19 percent?

"The pension debt is void, as the council did not comply with the Charter requirement for an auditor's certificate committing to these massive obligations," says Stirling.

Says Rider, "At best Sanders's budget is tenuous; at worst it is Pollyannaish and a fantasyland, predicated on very big 'ifs.' '

From the standpoint of honesty, it's worse than that.

filmed in a "blue room," she

tells me. The appearance of animated figures and scenery slowly replaces the blue. As the production process unfolds, "the computer takes the blue away," says Yu-tzu. Several incomplete scenes she shows me on her laptop still have a little blue background left in them

With her background in sculpture, Yu-tzu feels she brings the sensibilities of traditional fine art to her work. "The most important thing that allows me to do is visualize what's good and what's bad," she says.

Yu-tzu's husband expresses a similar reverence for artistic purity. Eventually Wong would like to paint in his own studio. He's grateful for his current job in animation, but he worries that, even though he takes training classes at Sony, "techniques I've mastered already make it harder to use newer technologies. Younger artists coming into the field do better with them." But at least Wong and Yu-tzu don't have to be starving artists - as long as the immigration process keeps working for them.

("Sax"), Geoff Bouvier colorfully illuminated the intersection points of jazz greats, like Charles McPherson, with the San Diego community, eliciting accolades from his interviewees for such hotspots as Dizzy's. However, he unfortunately neglected one of this city's most significant resources for internationally acclaimed jazz, the Athenaeum Music & Arts Library.

For many years now, the Athenaeum has presented the finest jazz performers at three different venues: the Athenaeum in La Iolla (for 15 years), the Neurosciences Institute (for 10), and the organization's School of the Arts Studio in University Heights (for 5). Charles McPherson, the subject of the cover story, performed here in 1997 and, your readers would probably like to know, will return this July 6 with his quartet, featuring Rob Schneiderman on piano and Jeff Littleon on bass (with drums to be announced). Other recent luminaries whom the Athenaeum has brought to San Diego include Pat Martino, John Scofield, Carla Bley, and

Regina Carter, just to name a few. Also, folks who are interested in the detailed history of an instrument such as the saxophone would find the library's collection an invaluable resource for this kind of information. The Athenaeum holds hundreds of books on jazz history and personalities, as well as CDs, DVDs, and periodicals. These materials are available to borrow by members for a nominal annual fee; membership also includes discounts on concert tickets.

The next time your publication features a prominent story on jazz music or artists, your writers would do well to visit the Athenaeum and discover all it has to offer.

The other day I was crossing the street when some guy in his flashy car practically kneecapped me. As he went by I gave him my best glare, and he yelled back, "No crosswalk." I wasn't jaywalking. There just wasn't a crosswalk painted on the street. Don't cars have to yield to pedestrians who are crossing streets legally, even if there's no painted crosswalk? – Pedestrians Have Rights Too, Kensington

An inquiry close to my heart. M.A. is a confirmed walkaholic. Sitting on my can in front of a computer all day is like being buried alive. But as a full-disclosure know-it-all, I must admit my career is tarnished with two jaywalking tickets. By comparison, I have acquired exactly zero traffic tickets. Apparently I'm no threat behind the wheel, but, let loose on foot, I become some witless wanderer, a danger to myself and others. If my word has any validity, given that shameful

record, here's your answer. Paragraph 21950(a) of the California Vehicle Code states, "The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection...." Judgment in favor of us pedestrians, seems to me. Paragraph 21950 also talks about how both driver and pedestrian must exercise "due care" for the pedestrian's safety (a case-by-case judgment call). You can't leap out from between parked cars and expect drivers to come to a screeching halt. As a side note, if you're crossing the street on a foot-powered scooter, you're still a pedestrian. But Paragraph 21200 of the same code says, "Every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway...is subject to all the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle...." Stop at stop signs, don't ride against traffic, yield to pedestrians, give directional signals — all those things most bike riders usually don't do. Even San Diego's muni code says skateboards and scooters and Big Wheels on sidewalks have to yield to us walkers. So, the pedestrian is king. As it should be.

Dear Almighty Matt:

Okay, here's the deal. I, along with many of my fellow Americans, have a strange fascination with beer. I mean, what's better than beer? Not much. Well, the other night I was once again enjoying a healthy dosage of my favorite brew when I noticed something. There were small Braille sequences on the bottom rim of the bottle. This was not a concern at first, until I started to examine other bottles that we had lying around. All the sequences were different on different brands. Some of the same brands from the same case are all different. This is really starting to bother me, as I cannot even hold a bottle in my hand anymore without trying to figure it out. What do they mean? Are they the name of the beer? Or the price? Do blind people read them in order to determine what they are drinking? Perhaps they are really the map to some treasure or the secret of the universe. Either way, I don't think I will be able to rest until I know.

What a charming picture you paint of your living quarters. And why should our fascination with beer be "strange"? It's cheap, it's legal, it gets you stoned. What's so strange about that? And, no, the little dots aren't there as a guide for people who get blind drunk.

Real-world factlet: Beer-makers make beer. Beer-bottle makers make beer bottles and sell them to people who make beer. So, as we found out, brewers don't know what the little dots are either. According to our friends at Owens-Brockway, makers of lots and lots of bottles for lots and lots of beer companies, the string of tiny lumps is a binary or hex code (depending on manufacturer) that indicates in which set of molds the bottle was made. It's for quality control, so if a lot of defective bottles are coming off the line, they'll know where to start looking for the problem. Bottles from a single manufacturer will have many different dot patterns, so by the time the product gets to you, you probably have bottles from various parts of the manufacturing grid and therefore various dot patterns.

To translate the code into useable information, the bottle-maker illuminates the bumplets, then scans them with a light meter hooked to a computer. Newer technology allows printed codes to be scanned directly, so you'll eventually see fewer dots and more readable letters and numbers. And now that I've answered that one, let me save you 39 cents and answer your next question. Beer bottles have concave or lumpy or otherwise marked-up bottoms to keep the wet glass from creating a vacuum when it's placed on a flat surface, so you don't lift the table off the floor when you pick up your drink. By the way, if you had anything in glass in your house besides brew, you'd note that the dot codes are ubiquitous, not just a beer thang.

The Chargers Are Coming Home

es, I understand that \$500 million is a lot of money to steal in seven months. Or is it expropriate? Or legislate? Perambulate? Something like that. No matter, \$500 million is the going rate for a new NFL stadium, and we must face up to that fact.

Mayor Jerry "We're Broke And I Don't Have The Time" Sanders admitted San Diego has so righteously fucked up its finances that the city can no longer afford the tribute that a second-tier NFL franchise commands. With that, Sanders gamely announced he would try to amend the city's agreement with the Chargers so that, between whenever the agreement is legally amended and December 31, 2006, any city in San Diego County would be permitted to enter into talks with the Chargers in hopes of relocating that treasure to their jurisdiction.

Pretty damn generous of Jerry Sanders to open the gates and let every San Diego County municipality in. Gentlemen, let the stampede begin.

As you would expect, I've called around and taken preliminary soundings. First up was Gary Brown, city manager of Imperial Beach, who told me, "No. Our city would not be one of those [cities negotiating with the Chargers]." An officious female at El Cajon's city offices ordered me to call back. Poway was not interested. Ditto San Marcos. Lemon Grove was not inclined, neither was La Mesa. Santee is out. Oceanside, Chula Vista, and National City will cough up \$500 million as soon as gasoline hits 50 cents a gallon.

Just a damn minute, people! It's beginning to look like no city is interested. Where are the men of yesteryear, captains of industry, men willing to take their measure against skies of blue and fields of yellow and thundering surf of white and majestic mountain tops of purple?

Well, I know such a man. Robert Mitchell is his name. He bestrides Jacumba like a colossus.

Jacumba just about fits all the requirements needed to bid for the Chargers. There is no doubt that the village of 440 is in San Diego County. True, it's three miles from the Imperial County line, but that's still San Diego County, bucko. Ask any lawyer. Yes, Jacumba is on the border with Mexico, but not over the border in Mexico. Again, ask any lawyer. Jacumba, while not technically a city, does have a water district, and said water district does have *elective* officers. Mr. Robert Mitchell was once a member of that water board, vested with the responsibility of overseeing the people's business. And that's good enough when you're talking about free money and over-the-counter bribes

I have Mitchell on the telephone. "Bob, I called to learn Jacumba's attitude toward the San Diego Chargers.'

Mitchell says, "Seems to me, quite frankly, if San Diego wants to consider putting an airport out here, and they've been playing that up in such a large fashion, then it's most appropriate to put the stadium here, too."

Robert Mitchell arrived in Jacumba several decades past on a mission to buy the town. He's been making steady progress ever since. I mention the half-billion-dollar cost of a new football stadium and ask, "How are the folk of Jacumba going to finance this?"

"Like America was financed," Bob says, with lotteries. We'll have a lottery.

Spot on, Robert, Hmm, I wonder what his civic responsibilities are nowadays. Mitchell tells me, "I'm the president emeritus or something and life standing board member of the arts council."

Perhaps, I better flesh that out. "What?"

"Jacumba Arts Council. I'm on the board of directors, past president, and founding member.'

For those who came in late, Mr. Mitchell was also the founder and publisher of the late Jacumba Plain Speaker. Bob is president of Jacumba Hot Springs Spa and Cabana Club, Jacumba's sole hot spot, restaurant, bar, and hotel. Due to space considerations, I will not speak of the diamond business, commodities trading, international currencies, Mexican time shares, or any other of the several dozen perfectly legal businesses Mr. Mitchell has been associated with in the past.

Just brainstorming now, I offer, "I think an official invitation to the Chargers..

Mitchell interrupts, "I think it's a wonderful idea. We have an Arts Council meeting coming up in a few days. I'm going to have the council send a letter to the Chargers, requesting them to come out here and begin discussions with us.

"Welcome to the 15th Annual Good Friday Walk with the Suffering," said Rosemary Johnston from the flatbed of the truck parked in front of the County Health Building on Pacific Highway. "We're going to be visiting different public institutions in downtown San Diego this morning, and at each station of the cross, we will remember a particular segment of our community which is suffering, in remembrance of Jesus' suffering on the road to Calvary." To her right knelt Jesus, played by a student from St. Augustine's High School. Pilate (who hailed from Our Lady of

Peace — all the other roles were played by women) stood before him, pointing a condemning finger.

This was the first station, the first of 15 tableaus that the students would create and hold as one of the various speakers offered a reflection. The first suffering segment: the homeless. In Psalm 113, said the speaker, "God is pictured as very powerful, but very much connected with earth. He stoops, he condescends, he comes down to look. He lifts the poor from the dirt...and he invites us to lift.... If we have done it to the least of His brethren, it is as if we have done it to Christ himself."

Second station: Jesus takes up his cross. Remembered segment: victims of torture. We started by singing: "Where you there/when they nailed Him to the tree...""Crucifixion was the most cruel and

painful form of torture known in Jesus' day What meaning does love have if you allow torture to continue unopposed?"

The truck drove to the next location, in front of the County Administration Building. Jesus walked, followed by the women and the soldiers, followed by roughly 85 people from various denominations. The morning sun began to warm. As we walked, we sang: "Here I am Lord/Is it I, Lord?/I have heard you calling in the night..."

Third station: Jesus falls for the first time. Remembered segment: those affected by substance abuse. We sang: "Weakened, prodded, cursed and fallen/His whole body bruised and swollen ... " "Avoid immorality," said the speaker, reading from Paul. "Every other sin a person commits is outside the body, but the immoral person sins against his own body. Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit?"

Fourth station: Jesus meets Mary. Remembered segment: foster children. "The average child in foster care waits three years for placement I think we as a community need to ... do whatever

we can to lessen their suffering and address the brokenness that they experience."

We marched on, to the State Office Building at Ash and Front Streets, for the fifth station: Simon helps Jesus. Remembered segment: those without affordable health care. Here also, the sixth: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus. A woman asked "that the Lord's mercy and love bring women who have had an abortion to a place of healing and reconciliation, that they will know they can be forgiven by God, and that they can forgive themselves because of what Jesus did for them in His crucifixion and death.

The marching song shifted to "Jesus, remember me/When you come into your kingdom" as we headed to the County Courthouse. A trolley driver doffed his hat as he passed. Seventh station: Jesus falls the second time, remembering the suffering caused by gang violence. "Religion is still the civilizing force that unites us all."

Station eight — Jesus speaks to the women of Jerusalem — brought some fire to the flatbed.

The speaker was lamenting the lack of affordable housing. "The prophet Ezekiel said these words: I will seek the lost...and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice'.... The cross brings judgment on those who turn their backs on the needy."

"Ubi Caritas" was our song on the way to the Metropolitan Correctional Center for Jesus' third fall at station nine. There, a prison minister reminded us that "we're all going to need help being lifted up sooner or later," and that some of those in prison were "more free, because they know the sins they've committed and they've opened up their hearts to Christ."

Stations ten and eleven — Jesus is stripped, then nailed to the cross - were held outside the Federal Building, and recalled the sufferings of the undocumented; in particular,

the lack of a just wage. "The final word to you arrogant rich...the groans of the workers you've used and abused are a roar in the ears of the Master Avenger. You've looted the earth and lived it up, but all you have to show for it as a fatter than usual corpse."

We processed to the rotunda outside Horton Plaza for stations 12 and 13 — Jesus' death and removal from the cross. The weather had turned cloudy and cold; the sky began to threaten. We recalled the suffering brought by mental illness and the degradation of the environment. The rain broke as we returned to the haunting lines of "Were You There?" for the long walk to the Broadway Pier. There, we huddled under a concrete overhang for stations 14 and 15 - the burial and resurrection. A Quaker spoke against war, repeating Christ's command to "love your enemies and pray for your persecutors.... All war is evil; all wars bring destruction and suffering." A final song ("Lord of the Dance") and a responsive prayer closed out the procession: "Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed, alleluia!"

"It's no use," said my friend Connie on Easter Monday. "When it comes to the in-laws, there are certain things that brand you a Bad Mom, and this is one of them." The day before, during cleanup, her six-year-old daughter Emma had dropped the gravy boat on the kitchen floor. When it shattered, as gravy boats will do, the little girl cried, "Oh, shit!"

Everyone was flabbergasted, including Connie. Grandma May glared at Connie all through dessert. Emma got the word from her

brother William, 13. He got it from school. Connie's husband is away a lot, and she's not huge on discipline. She sought advice from me, and I turned around

and sought it from some more expert sources. Jean M. Twenge, Ph.D., Associate Profes-

sor of Psychology at SDSU, is the author of the recently published Generation Me: Why Today's Young Americans Are More Confident, Assertive, Entitled — and More Miserable

Than Ever Before (\$25 at Barnes & Noble; www.generationme.com). "A lot of teenagers will swear just to try to shock their parents," she offered. "But these days, many young people swear because it's just the way they talk. It's more acceptable to swear now than it used to be."

Why? "People now are not as concerned with what others think of them. In a previous era, a person might think, 'If I swear, people are going to think that I sound uneducated, or uncouth.' But there's been a general social trend toward doing 'what's right for you' rather than 'what's right for other people, for society, or for the group.' There's lots of data, both scientific and anecdotal, to support the idea that American culture has moved much more toward individuality in the last few decades. And in the last five to ten years, it's been accelerated by a lot of media trends. You don't have to listen to an album anymore: you can mix the music however you want on your iPod. You don't have to watch a television show when it airs; you can TiVo it. People call it iMedia.

Twenge thinks that "swearing is part of that social trend. People want to express themselves in this way, and don't really care what other people think when they do it." Further, "there's a trend toward being more casual. You have more informality in dress now, and more informality in speech. People call each other by their

first names.'

So much for where it came from; what to do about it? Twenge suggested that Connie "help the kid gain a perspective on other people's impressions. If no one cared what other people thought of them, this world would be unlivable. In getting along in the world, one of the most important things is the impression you're making on others. And for both kids and adults, to have good relationships with other people is the bedrock of mental health."

I also talked to Dr. Tom, my friend Dee's father-in-law. Dr. Tom is a developmental psy"People now are not as concerned with what others think

chologist, specializing in the moral development of children. He started with little ones like Emma, and worked up the age ladder to William. "Parents are usually shocked when they hear the first vulgar language coming from their angeliclooking preschooler, but it's all part of verbal experimentation. However, that doesn't mean you should accept it. I don't agree with the notion, 'If you ignore it, it will go away.' It's true that kids are usually doing it for attention, but for one thing, it's almost impossible to ignore it, especially under circumstances where it's embarrassing. And for another, ignoring bad language deprives kids of something they very much need for their moral development: clear social feedback when their behavior is inappropriate. Bad language is unacceptable because other people don't like to hear it - or, put positively, polite people don't talk that way in front of others. Needless to say, to make that stick, we have to watch our own language." If explanations aren't enough, "you can add a consequence: a negative consequence, like loss of a privilege; or sometimes a positive consequence

that makes up for the lapse. One family had a jobs jar - you drew a slip of paper with a job on it to make up for the problem you had caused."

Like Twenge, Dr. Tom encouraged the idea of getting older kids like William to be more reflective. You want them to realize that language is a social act. They have a responsibility to be sensitive to people who are affected

by their speech. They might say that it's no big deal if they talk this way with their friends, because that's the way everybody talks. You want them to realize that language that becomes a matter of habit with friends is easily generalized to other environments. These days, kids carry bad language into the classroom - they're using it in the hallways, and they continue to talk that way once they enter class. Even if they try to inhibit it, it slips out during group work, or when they're making journal entries."

And if a kid says, "That's just the way I talk"? "A good question to ask is, Are there any situations where you don't use bad language?' In fact, there are lots of situations where kids watch their language, consciously or unconsciously. They don't use the f-word at their grandfather's funeral, or in a job interview. They use a certain kind of speech when they

want to make a good impression. If you ask them why they don't swear in those situations, they'll say, 'It wouldn't be respectful.' So they realize that some language is respectful and other language is not."

Finally, he suggested teaching a child that "language reveals a person's character - and it also shapes it. Coarse language, over time, creates a coarse person. And if you don't develop the habit of controlling your language, bad words will come out in situations that make the situation worse. In college, some students use bad language when confronted by university police, and the situation escalates very quickly."

Reaching the T at the end of the aisle, I turned right toward the language section rather than left toward the cashiers.

"You still want to learn Japanese?" I asked David, who was following close behind, sifting through my selection. This is how big things sometimes begin with a simple question. David's baby blue eyes shot up from the book jacket they'd been examining and he flashed his teeth and dimples in a quick smile. "I'll take that as a yes," I said, before turning around to scan the language aisle shelves for the letter J.

David has occasionally mentioned the three semesters of Japanese classes he took before we first met. He has frequently expressed his desire to get back to his lessons, but despite his interest, he hasn't made the time. It takes more than intention to bridge the gap between wanting to do something and actually doing it - it takes enthusiasm, which is where I came in. David handed me back my stack of novels, sat on the floor, and began sifting through the binders of Japanese language workbooks. A flutter of excitement coursed through me. I was about to discover something new, to demystify and understand a foreign language, which would forever change my perception of the world, and I couldn't have been any more impatient to get started.

I thought about our choice to learn this language over the many others that seemed so much more practical. I knew why David had chosen it — one need only spend some time with him or simply glance at his space or his art, without ever sharing a word, and instantly understand his strong attraction to the Japanese culture and aesthetic. I remember the first time he took me to a sushi restaurant. The sushi chef had asked David where he had learned to handle his chopsticks, for his table manners were on par with what the chef himself had been trying, unsuccessfully, to teach his teenagers.

Simply drop the first letter from my love's name and you are left with his zest for

all things proper. Much of the Japanese culture is based upon this sense of formal politeness for which David strives. This was evident in one of the first phrases he learned in class *osakini*, an apology used when one is first to leave a room that literally translates as "Pardon my going first before you."

When we arrived home, I removed the books one at a time from the large plastic bag and set them side by side on the counter, but not before inspecting the clean, smooth jackets and diving nose first into the pages, where I simultaneously tested the texture beneath my thumb and sniffed deeply of the printed paper, my favorite perfume. The workbooks were the last to come out of the bag. I placed them left to right in the order they would be tackled: *Hiragana, Katakana*, and *Japanese for Busy People I* (the *Kana* version).

"I would love to read haiku poems in their original form," David said, leaning over me to finger the *hiragana* workbook. David, who would rather sit on a cliff and lose himself in the rhythm of the waves crashing below than attend any party or see any movie, has a reverence for nature that borders on Shintoism. The simple, elegant, and natureinspired poetry native to Japan encapsulates those qualities he holds most dear. "You know," he said, "in Japan they honor and cherish nature. Everybody, whether they're young, old, men, or women, *everybody* gets excited about the cherry blossoms every year. Many of them believe that a rock or a moun-

Detecting the note of profound respect in David's voice, I smiled at him and then looked down at the 46 elaborate, picturesque characters printed within squares that were neatly stacked in a way that was reminiscent of the Periodic Table of Elements I had studied in my high school chemistry class. They looked like the marginal doodles of an expert calligrapher. Loops and lines, meticulous strokes, there was that flutter again — this was all so foreign.

"You know why I want to learn Japanese?" I asked David. He looked at me in expectation. "Because I want us to be able to talk about people who are right in front of us without them knowing what we're saying." I took delight in imagining the expressions that would appear on the faces of confused shoppers upon overhearing two gaijin like David and me using the Asian language to discuss the price of ground turkey. (Gaijin is the

Japanese word for any person who is not Japanese — literally translated, it means "barbarian.")

"Yeah, that would be fun," he said, but he knew we'd both cringe at the thought of being so rude as to deliberately exclude someone from our conversation. I conjured the image of an impressed-looking sushi chef who had just heard me casually ask him to pass the soy sauce in his native tongue.

"I mean, aside from the fact that we plan to visit Japan someday," I said, tracing my finger along the character that looks like a horseshoe. "I want to learn Japanese because it's a cool thing to do."

"Me too," said David. Coolness was a factor not to be underestimated, but my real reasons remained unarticulated. Like David, I am taken by the language's grace and formality, and a part of me believes that learning to speak it will help me to obtain these traits. But it was more than that. I needed something like this. I needed a project in which I could immerse myself, and not just any project, but one that required some level of isolation.

Language is the tool that brings people together, but in learning Japanese, I finally saw that language could also be used to distance oneself. I have these phases during which I just want to get away — shut off my phone, drive somewhere far and simply *be*.

Now, instead of hopping in my car and disappearing, I can virtually escape to a faroff land. I can process my thoughts in a foreign tongue and watch simple objects around me transform into something exotic and new a chair is not just a chair anymore, it is also an *isu*. My hand is also a *te*, and my eye is one of two *meh*.

"I can't really explain it right now," I said to David, who was bent over, balancing himself on the counter with his elbows and flipping through the *katakana* workbook. When he glanced up at me I chided myself for assuming he had any way to know what I'd been thinking. That happens when you spend as much time with someone as I spend with David — you begin to assume he can see your thoughts. "But I'm really happy we're doing this," I continued. "And it's going to be so much easier and a lot more fun because we're doing it together."

"So desu," David said softly, and I thought perhaps he had heard the inner workings of my mind after all. *"*It means, 'that's right."" *"Yeah*," I agreed. *"So it*

is. I mean, *so desu*." ■

He bounces onto the seat, then starts the diesel motor. Rolling a blue kerchief tightly, he bands it carefully around his shaved head and square-knots its ends just under the occipital bone. The snug cinch means business. An ex-gang member and former director of rehab at Victory Outreach ministry ("God found me," he says, "I didn't find God"), Salazar has the bruised look of a man who's bucked too much authority.



polyethylene portable toilets, sump and urinal ---to vacuum out and scrub down. Scattered in groups of two or six, they've sat untended since Friday morning. "I keep them real clean," Salazar says. "They're never dirty, they're never stinky." He's 53, and he's been driving one of Spanky's 22 trucks and servicing units for ten months. Real longevity

in this business.

People think smelling and vacuuming human waste is the hard part. Not true, Salazar says. It's the back-and-forth driving that accounts for the long — 8, 10, 12 — hours. His 140-mile-a-day route is like a marble let loose in a skateboarder's bowl: down to Summers Ridge, down to Convoy,

over to Harris Plant, back up to Black Mountain, three miles out to Andasol, two miles back up to Crisscross Lane. Shea Homes, Park and Ride, Valley Crest Commercial Park — and that's just before lunch, which is nestled in a cooler beside him next to two cold-sweating water bottles. When he sees eight units shouldered together, it's "ice cream and strawberries"; otherwise, it's pull up, get out, clean the unit, move the truck, one here, one there, two here, two there. But still, nothing's worse than freeway on-ramps and backups — it's enough to try his patience, hunch up his shoulders, activate his hustle (fast walking with a bucket), so (maybe) he can get home by three to see his granddaughter.

Salazar tends 77 to 127 units a day. At private homes, rest areas, stadium events, landfills, the San Diego County Fair, nurseries, "anyplace where people work or play outside." The VIP units and the handicapped ones (top-of-the-line potties run \$25,000), with sinks and paper towel dispensers,

take longer. Each unit, he estimates, takes him four minutes.

Salazar parks the truck's driver's side as close to the units as possible. He button-starts the truck's pump, and the grinding noise, like an airplane propeller, begins. He unfurls the four-inch-diameter corrugated hose, attached to the powerful vac. He pulls open the Potti's spring-hinged door, props it against his backside, and flips up the toilet seat. He plunges the hose onto the pyramidal pile of turds and TP; the pile is like a volcanic isle, rimmed by the Windex blue of a chemical sea. Salazar shakes and repositions the hose; it lurches and leaps like a worm exposed to the sun. The waste is sucked — the sound alternates from a loaded keeeeee to an air-moving hiss — into the truck's 700-gallon tank.

Inside the tank, a chemical mix of ferric chloride and sodium hydroxide treats the solids quickly. The sump emptied, Salazar turns the pump off, then fills a bucket with soap and water from the truck's onboard spigot. With a water hose, he squirts the urinal, seat, lid, and floor; with a broad, wood-handled brush, he two-hand scrubs the toilet seat, random stains, wall graffiti (in one, "Mexican power," in another, "lick balls white boy"), and the muddy floor. By now, sweat beads are glistening above his headband. Next, he pours five gallons of water into the crapper, then hoses it all down. He drops in the dye pellet. He puts in new toilet paper and squirts a bottle of fragrance as a finishing touch.

Salazar's uniform is an olive drab shirt and blue drab pants; under



his short-sleeved shirt is

a long-sleeved quilted

undershirt, very worn.

gave us long plastic gloves," clearing the elbows, "but they're too hot." Instead, he wears hand-sized rubber gloves. Even still, on his way to the shower at home, he might hear,

"Oh, Dad, you smell, you smell." A hard hat approaches a Porta Potti tentatively. What's he think's inside? Pool of vomit? Trapped rattler? Eau de open grave? Such fears hardly compare to what Salazar's encountered. Miscreants "wad up paper towels with nails and staples and throw it in there. Just to

be jerks. I spend an hour unclogging it; I gotta go in there, man. A couple two, three weeks ago, they did that, and the staples got stuck right in the middle of the hose. I had to make a big old wire with a hook and pull it, pull it. I was so mad I felt like calling out at everybody, 'You jerks...' " his voice trailing off. Every so often a unit is tipped over, and it's Salazar's job to set it back up and open the door and curse the brown-black smears on the walls, which are like, well, you can imagine.

When the hose puts the waste in motion that's the worst smell: something unholy pierces the air, the crap and the sodium hydroxide vying for dominance. Despite a long hot shower, the smell can linger in the membranes of one's nose and mouth. A regurgitative spasm (the gag reflex) may kick in. "Sometimes, it gets to me," Salazar says. He feigns retching, "Ugg-huk, ugghuk," then flashes an avuncular smile.

Once a week Salazar offloads the truck's waste at Pump Station No. 1 on Harbor Drive. During the week, he often gets headaches or suffers pain in his shoulders and neck from twisting his head around to back up the pumper truck. In Poway, he has to back up a mile and a half to get to one unit. Sometimes he gets bacterial ailments; he suspects it's the feces'

germs. Once his throat and tonsils swelled and he couldn't breathe – he waited 90 minutes for his HMO doctor, got disgusted and left, then drove to Tijuana, where he bought antibiotics over the counter that fixed it.

On the back of the truck a sign is bolted: Drivers Wanted / Great Benefits / Will Train. (Nothing rivals a back East promo: Scott's Pots: We're Number 1 in Number 2.) At Spanky's, guys come and go; they're fired or on Monday morning they don't show. Maybe it's Salazar's values that keep him showing up. He says, "My conviction is different from the conviction of the world. I have to clean those toilets just like my wife or my daughter was going to use it - or myself. I can't leave without putting all the chemicals in. I won't be at peace; I'll have to come back and do it the right way.

"I'm content," he says at last. Not just with his job but with his life.

It sure beats the cold rooms he's been in, before God gave him wing. "Besides," he chuckles, "somebody's got to do it." An old cliché about dirty work, but Salazar says it with the conviction that he's the somebody.

* *

Except on Ramon Salazar's route, the world of the privy, the world many of our grandparents knew, rarely exists. Instead, we flush it away. If it doesn't stay away, we call the Metropolitan Wastewater Department. Metropolitan is best known for the number of sewage spills — 365 in 2000 and 63 in 2005. The reason for the decrease is simple: city sewer crews now record the clogs via a computer program; they scour drains that have a larger amount of grease, roots, and sludge more frequently.

Such routine preventive maintenance is the domain of Brian Kirkendall and Henry

down Tierrasanta's Escobar Drive, Kirkendall positions the truck above a manhole cover. On the truck's back are several water tanks, 11,000-gallon capacity, and a large tank to vacuum up spills (Rodriguez brags about

its power: the vac can lift a 16-pound bowling ball). At the nose of the truck, placed just above the manhole, is a 600foot hose coiled on a winch. Rodriguez pries off the manhole lid, and the pair gaze in. Only certified personnel, the confined-spaces unit, are allowed down there. The truck's noise obscures the rivulet, 20 feet below, which is flowing vigorously.


Kirkendall begins lowering the sled and its heavy nozzle into the manhole. The sled is a dual-purpose device: its six prongs, shaped like an asterisk, loosen and drag out debris while a nozzle squirts water at very high pressure, 65 gallons per minute. Sewer lines are a gravitybased system through which the constant drainage of toilets, sinks, showers, tubs, and washing machines starts the effluent moving. Kirkendall says he cleans "against flow" and pulls back "with flow." Hoseand-nozzle travels up the drain, dislodges

Kirkendall turns the sled into an eight-inchdiameter lateral line that brings the waste of an eight-unit apartment complex to the main line. Once the nozzle is tucked into the lateral line, Kirkendall cues the winch motor to push the hose up the line's length. He eyes the above-ground distance of the apartments' carport; experience tells him it's about 110 feet. Watching the counter, he sees the hose reach its end at 119. He then activates the nozzle's spray and begins retracting the hose. As it's wound onto the winch, the force of the water pressure cleans the drain.

Meanwhile, Rodriguez has dropped a long steel pole into the manhole; at the end of it is a large scoop (like those in grocery-store nut bins, though this one is perforated). The scoop sits against the main sewer line so as to trap tree roots, sand, rocks, debris, which the crew is freeing up from the lateral line. The scoop collects the debris, which the men lift out

of the manhole and later dump at the landfill.

Rodriquez uses a mirror to shine light into the hole. At the first whiff, Kirkendall says, "That's a light smell." He laughs: "I do this every day, so I can tell you what's going on down there." One minute later, the gaseous stench wafts toward us, and it's bad — battlefield-dead bad. It's bigger in volume and thickness than a vacuum pump humping a Porta Potti. What is that smell? In 2001, five Japanese scientists decided to study "the malodorous substances of human waste." Testing excreta and urine, they found very small amounts of ammonia, other nitrogen compounds, and hydrogen sulfide (the rotten-egg smell). However, 90 percent of the malodorous compounds were fatty acids. When such waste meets air, uncovered or

nozzled loose in a sewer drain - wheevyyeeewww, it comes to rancid life.

Suddenly a very light fecal mist rises out of the manhole; just as it meets me, I bend back. To no avail. Part of this visible stink, Kirkendall says, is "any kind of grease these people decide to pour down the drain." The hot grease flows from the kitchen drains (San Diego, don't pour grease down the *drain*) and hardens as it cools. Once the highpressure spray loosens that rotting grease, agglutinated to the walls of the drain — "Peee-u," Kirkendall spumes. "You never get used to that." When Kirkendall began sewer maintenance in 2000, he threw up his first three days on the job. Day four he was used to it.

Rodriguez says on occasion they get slimed from the backwash;

especially bad are sprays from shallow manholes. Both men wear flexible grip-mesh gloves; Rodriguez has on disposable pants, their tarplike white plastic fitting loosely over his jeans. "If it's on you," Kirkendall says, "it's rough." They carry cleaning solutions and, at home, leave their boots outside and shower right away.

They bring up the scoop: there's sludge (sand, rocks, semisolid waste) and root-balls. In the root-balls, they've found cell phones, pagers, silverware, jewelry, tampons, drug paraphernalia. Finishing, Kirkendall and Rodriquez hoist up the sled. From its end dangles a pair of thong underwear. "Hey, Henry," Kirkendall calls out, grabbing the torn pair. "It's Calvin Klein."

* * *

A law of nature, we leave our messes for others to clean. When a local person dies or is removed from a home and his or her mess can't be tidied up by next of kin, the County of San Diego's social services gets the call. A crew of two estate movers comes to "marshal the assets" - salvage what's personal and saleable and trash the rest. Performing such home autopsies is the job of James "Sam" Samson.



"No...," and then I enter a stink that must have been common during bubonic plagues: rat urine and feces. The stench is repulsive. On the linoleum floor lies a young rat, flattened and moist: it might have met a bootish death. Surrounding the sink, ricesized turds stipple the counter; rat-munched bits of paper dot the floors. The carpet's soaked with rat urine. The tiny turds are everywhere. "What's that?" A live one rustles in the corner. Samson estimates there are a halfdozen rats here; every cereal box (there are many) has a finely chewed hole through the cardboard, its contents gobbled.

The first day, Samson recalls, Hymie "was emptying the linen closet. He pulled out the top linen pile — he's a bit shorter than me and there was a rat on

top of the towels that came out; he had to jump out of the way while it bounced off the wall." Samson's a "reptile person" with a pet boa at home; he's caught rats (he wears leather gloves) and fed them to his snake. "It's the only thing I've ever got free out of this job," he says, laughing. Though Samson washes his hands often, he forgoes cleaner's garb. The stench doesn't bother him either. Yes, it gets in his clothes and hair: "It's with me all the time." Can he describe it? "A human death, a rodent it all smells the same. I can't describe it."

Rat and deadhuman smells are nothing for Samson. In a collar-close aside, he tells me the most gaggable story I would hear. In one woman's home that he was emptying, he discovered that the son, who lived in the garage,


had stored his own feces in five-gallon buckets in an attached room. "We had walls and walls of it. Lined up, boards and buckets, floor to ceiling." Why? "I don't know," Samson says, "but it was a bad smell," and he laughs raucously at the ridiculousness of what he's just said. He didn't end up with that bucket duty: "A private attorney took the house over. And we were very happy."

The trailer has a kitchen, living room, two small bedrooms, two bathrooms. Unopened boxes, canned goods, dressers whose drawers won't close. To case a bedroom, Samson must shoulder the door to get in. Coolers, furniture, lawn chairs, rolled rugs, draperies are strewn about. Grease slathers the range top; a smear beside the door, probably a grimy hand, dirties the wall. In a shed out back is an upright freezer, its six shelves bulging with packages of meat: thankfully, the power's still on. (Many senile seniors stash as much food as they hoard junk.) A tub in one bathroom, a shower in the other, are storage shafts — bric-a-brac, laundry baskets, hangered blouses, a plastic Christmas tree. "She didn't shower, she didn't bathe," Samson says. I hear no hint of judgment in his voice. At 53, he has clear eyes and a trim moon-white beard; a long, graying ponytail streams out the back opening of his ball cap. In 1997, when the Heaven's Gate community committed mass suicide in Rancho Santa Fe, it was Samson who disposed of the home's contents, including the purple fabrics, triangularly draped on the victims.

Neighbors knew about the old woman's plight and tried to help, Samson notes. But she wouldn't let anyone in to clean up. How bad it had gotten is evident by her mattress — one side is covered with merchandise and pillows, electrical cords, and shoe-boxed photos; the other side is worn to the stuffing, flattened at the spot she sat on getting in and out of bed, and badly stained. When he first arrived at the trailer, Samson discovered a little path that the woman had worn from her bedroom through the living

room and kitchen to the workable toilet. He recalls that the bathroom sink — like the one in the kitchen was heaped high with stuff; presumably the sinks, also, were unused, perhaps unusable. Most places Samson and Hymie clean feature some danger: uncaged birds, black widow spiders, vicious dogs, scared cats: "The cats hide until you move something, then they run out and scare you." The worst? Fleas.

"We go into houses," Samson says, "where the owner's left or deceased and the pet's been taken to the humane society. One time there were three of us, and we forgot about

the pet. We started working. Nobody had any problems. The next thing I know, I'm feeling things on my legs. What the heck! I ignored it for a while. But then — we all wore white socks - I pulled my pant leg up, and my whole sock was completely black. I told the guys, 'Let's get out of here.' Outside, all of us were covered with fleas. We're taking off our shoes, our shirts, our jackets. Everything. We're just beating on each other. We sprayed ourselves." Later, after nine flea bombs and a professional exterminator, they went back in and finished the job.

Another danger is one Samson detects but never sees. When someone dies or is moved out of a home, neighbors "unfortunately have the attitude that whatever's here is free." He's had locks changed and left homes over a weekend; come Monday, he'll find evidence of a breakin — his sorting trashed; addicts' needles; pants on hangers, their pockets turned insideout

Samson calls the trailer, stench and all, his "office." For better or worse, "This is where I work." So what's salvageable? A Victrola, a rifle case, fishing poles, a package of clothespins, a stack of LPs. Time's long ago has been frozen inside the trailer. "There's not a lot of new here," Samson says. Any letters, pictures, bills, mail, items with handwriting, "We get all that back into the family stream." So far, in searching this trailer, he's ferreted out \$3000; in another mobile home, he found, wedged under drawers and taped behind mirrors, \$142,000. That money, as well as proceeds from auctions of the conservatee's belongings, is deposited into the person's estate or, in the case of death, is

given to the heirs.

At one point, Samson's boss, Kent Schirmer, shows up, dressed for E. coli. Office-bound Schirmer is unaccustomed to filth. He's wearing a Tyvek jumpsuit (a disposable

protective garment) and a breathing mask. Tyvek booties too. He says that sometimes the County will pay to have the home cleaned. But after inspecting the trailer with Samson, they agree: not in this case.

Schirmer says, "It's so bad, we'll probably pay someone to pull" it off the site. The landlord will like that. He'll get a new tenant right away.

Blue-collar work

abounds in positions where stigma and stain are partners. But what of those whose job is "clean," at least, its conditions (office, desk, paper, phone) steer clear of bodily fluids — and yet the work is labeled

dirty? We live in a society landscaped by corporations and their hierarchies. In fact, some white-collar positions, in which an employee must evaluate the finances or the performance of others, can be

1756 ESSEX STREET SAN DIEGO, CA 92103 619-297-3881 just as tainted as any blue-collar job. Most corporate work includes decent pay, benefits, even social standing. But such incentives seldom alleviate the anguish many experience when dealing with angry or wronged or broke or fragile people.

Take the bill collector. In Escondido, Barbara Crayton is the city's collections officer, a job she's been doing for four years. Friends believe that her job must be hard: "You have to deal with all those bad people." Bad as in debtors, who themselves are stigmatized as criminal, unstable, chaotic. But, Crayton tells me by phone, "They're not that bad. People are hounding them day and night for money. Not just me." They fight back, yelling and screaming at her at times. "But when I catch them, they know they owe me money, so they're a little sheepish. They may lie to me still. When they're yelling, I think it's a defense mechanism because they got caught. Every now and then it bothers me."

She mostly goes after people who've bounced checks for unpaid city services: park fees, library fines, paramedic costs, false alarm charges, and utility bills. The amounts are typically \$200 to \$300, sometimes more. Until she was laid off, Crayton worked in the banking business, collecting overdue homeloan payments. Home debt is secured, while money owed a city is unsecured, which Crayton calls "difficult because the target's moving." It's up to her, using her most professional, friendliest, and nonintimidating customer-service voice, to nail the debtor. Seeking payment,

she calls indebted customers or sends certified letters. Most don't return calls, or "they play a game": the collector's stupid. One woman insisted that her 20-year-old daughter didn't have to pay her debt because of her, the mother's, wealth and her Rancho Santa Fe address. Those cases Crayton shunts to smallclaims court. She invariably wins, though most will settle the bill before any hearing takes place.

Every year Crayton has four or five customers "who get to me." These individuals "were yelling and screaming. They refused to listen. They knew they owed the money, knew that they were wrong, but they continued to give you all the reasons why they shouldn't pay you the money: 'My mother died, my dog died, my husband left me' - anything but 'Okay, I owe you the money.' And that bothers me: I'd like them to take ownership of their debt. Instead, they attack me." She says they'll get livid and cauliflower her ear with "You don't understand. I have other bills to pay." Which is true: other collectors are already pursuing most people Crayton calls. "Or they say, 'I'm taking my kids on vacation.' I've had a customer who had a debt from summer classes tell me it was Christmas and she had to buy gifts. That's why she didn't have the money to pay me."

Sometimes people come into the office, visibly upset and making demands. Crayton says they try to snow her with lies she's heard repeatedly: they know the mayor; they know the councilmembers; they're going to have their attorney contact her. "Always, people say that," she says. To which





charged up everything, knowing he'd never pay."

Then, strong-arm tactics were thought to be justified. It was "easier," Allen says, "to holler and scream at somebody, belittle them, to get the money. It's a lot more difficult today to negotiate with people, to empathize with their situations." Municipal and hospital accounts make up 60 percent of his clients. With "this constituency," Allen says, they tread lightly. "Our job is not to upset the constituent, but it's to get the constituent to understand that it's tax-

payer money, which helps city services fixing potholes." Using kid gloves means training counselors to think and listen so that they will invite the debtor in "to find a solution for the debt. You can't talk to an adult" as if he were a child: "You owe \$500 and we want the money today!" At the same time, "While you're on the phone, you have to identify what kind of person this is." Counselors assess the kind of person they've got and adjust their responses. But, Allen continues, debtors may get abusive — "it's a defense

mechanism; they'll call you every name in the book" — or "you may get someone who's on the brink of a total meltdown, and you can put them right over the edge. That's not our job." And then, as the call nears the fiveminute maximum and the woes of the debtor keep spewing out, the counselor still has to press for payment. (Allen's operations manager, Robert Felan, says that one of his main tasks is to monitor the counselors telephonically, making sure they aren't trapped in a therapeutic session with a

debtor. "When the call gets to eight minutes," he says, "something's wrong. I intercede because we're not making any money by then.")

So, Allen says, it gets to them. The staff turnover is about 50 percent annually, and they leave because of the "stress and strain." Allen tells his workers that collecting municipal debt is "for the good of the community. You can go home at night and feel good about yourself." But, he admits, the daily disaster that people disclose takes a toll on his staff. "Have you ever

driven by a horrible car crash? For days, that can stick in your mind, make you horribly sick to your stomach. Sometimes you'll get one of those calls, and it'll tear you up. We can't sympathize, but we can empathize."

Among the dirtiest managerial tasks in the white-collar domain is that of firing employees. Letting go of staff can drive those who manage human resources nuts. Companies and institutions pay these people to sack workers through layoffs or involuntary

termination (a classic euphemism). It's a profession that attracts women; the work takes time, relational savvy, and lots of TLC. One such human resource manager is Lorraine Barrett (not her real name). At a local college, Barrett oversees a permanent staff of 200 and a revolving student staff of 600 who do lowskilled work. (Since workers' compensation claims and employee counseling make up the daily workload, human resource managers want anonymity for themselves, their employers, and their divisions.)

Barrett's been toiling in this field for many years. Her self-possession feels well-earned in a job that requires as much mordant laughter as gentle force.

Though Barrett counsels more than she fires, both duties are what she calls "time suckers." Why so much counseling? "There's an awful lot of walking wounded in the workplace," she says. "Functionally crazy. They really do have issues that impact others. They may be just not right depressed, anxious; they take offense where no offense is intended. They're wounded before they get here."

If she knew they were "that way," of course, she wouldn't hire them. Psychological problems surface later. "My toughest employees," she goes on, "are really intelligent people in a low-level job. They're underemployed." A job's monotony is seldom an issue. Rather, in Lorraine's experience, it's the interpersonal they can't handle. She says workers need anger management or medication, which she'll refer them to. One case deeply affected Lorraine. A woman "fit the profile" of an intelligent, organized, and facile worker. She had been at the college for five years and did her job without a hitch. No absenteeism. But she got into disputes with her manager and her coworkers. "When she did, she was very emotional. Crying. Yelling. She would say, 'I work so hard. I'm here every day. I don't understand why you can't do this, from the rumor mill — having an affair with somebody. She was



Why not fire her? "Because you need a lot to terminate," Barrett says. Easy cases are theft, sexual harassment, poor attendance, job abandonment, a fight on the job — "usually there's witnesses and evidence." Here, there was never enough evidence. "It didn't happen constantly; it happened sporadically. By now, though, I've got counseling, a letter, another letter, then a one-day suspension, then a three-, four-, five-day suspension. See what I mean? You're upping the ante. All the while, the woman's a hard worker; she's got no attendance issues. So she finally quits. And I'm sure she

quit because she was sure I wasn't going to give up," that is, eventually fire her.

"That was a sad case. There were a lot of broken bodies, I mean, people who were hurt by it." The wife of the man with whom she had the child — she also "was convinced that this woman was a witch. She had cast a spell over her husband and felt that her husband was leaving her and her two children." The accusations affected Lorraine's wellbeing. "I'm agonizing over what I think is right and wrong. I'm trying to keep my objectivity. I want to rescue the wronged wife. I want to fire this woman, and I

don't have enough evidence. What should I do? I can't misuse my power. I'm trying not to cry when I meet with the wife. Terrible. Terrible." Today, she's still trying not to cry — and not succeeding. Often the taint goes home with Barrett at night and on weekends. "Sometimes I need a scotch and a hot fudge sundae. There is some anaesthetizing that you do to cope."



jaunty woman, with brown eyes and chestnut hair; she's buoyed by her work. With a master's in business administration, she's been employed at several companies, handing out pink slips for 15 years. Hubler's been the regional director of human resources at her current gig for 2 years. Every day, she calms the tempests that rock her subordinates: eight human resource managers who oversee eight facilities and 1500 employees scattered throughout Southern California. At her office, in a glassy gray building on a cul-de-sac in Carlsbad, she does background checks and investigates employeemanager conflicts. She

travels to mediate and resolve employee issues and, when necessary, wields the hatchet.

Involuntary terminations take time. Loads to investigate — Why is this person coming in late? Why is he fighting with his supervisor? How long has this woman been on leave? Should we can him for bringing a gun to work, even though he's been a loyal employee for five years, or should we suspend him? What is going on in this man's personal life that's causing such anger? Hubler tells about one man who kept leaving work early on Fridays and coming in late on Mondays. The reason, which took much sleuthing to learn,



was that the man was spending the weekend with his wife at a cancer clinic more than 100

miles away. He never left early enough on Monday morning to beat the traffic and was always

late. Once Hubler sussed out the facts, she helped him rearrange his schedule.

The big cases she sees involve workers who harass other employees with offhanded remarks or sexual references and workers who constantly fight. These terminations can be hairy. Of late, one personality conflict, she says, has had her beside herself. "I don't know what to do. The two people don't get along, have never gotten along; they've been filing multiple complaints against each other; we bring them into the office, and they say, 'Everything's fine,' then we let them go [back to work], and there's

screaming matches. It's disruptive to the entire environment. We have suspended them, and they've filed multiple claims with state agencies against us because, in their eyes, we're doing everything wrong." Why don't they quit? "That's the question we all ask ourselves: 'If you hate your coworkers so much, why are you here? Can I give you a reference to go someplace else?" Now, she says, the solution is to assign the men separate shifts. They both counter that it's against their individual rights to be reassigned. Neither will change shifts; neither will respect the other; neither will admit wrong. "Short of sitting

in that facility 24 hours a day — what can you do?"

Another employee who was hurt on the job and filed a workman's compensation claim stayed away from work beyond the time he was supposed to. When he returned, he was drugtested, a standard procedure. He tested positive for Darvocet, a painkiller, for which he had no prescription. His "excuse" was that he was in very bad pain, and his mother gave him one of her pills. This violated the company's drug policy: no doctor's prescription, no employment. "The way the policy is set up, you can't make exceptions," says Hubler.

"We wanted to keep him, but we couldn't keep him. It was very hard. He was a good, good employee." Once the dispute "went through the legal department," the word came down: fire him. "You feel horrible. You have to be truthful. When I was starting out, managers would tell me to tell an employee, 'We don't have room for you,' to make it easier on me, the manager. Then we'd hire someone new, and the [fired] person would come back and say, 'What do you mean you didn't have room?' " Such dishonesty creeps back to haunt her.

A year ago an order for layoffs landed on her desk. She went to the facility, she did her duty. Today, when she walks in there, they'll greet her with " 'Oh, who are you here to fire?' Another is 'She's here to do the ax.' When I first started out I worked for a company that did mass lavoffs, and I closed a couple of buildings. I'd walk in, and people would just scatter." Group-termination announcements, she says, are much easier — much less chaos. At Enron, the employees were told over a loudspeaker that they had 15 minutes to leave the building. Hubler has never been on a firing squad like that, but she understands its necessity. Employers don't give notice to positions in

payroll or IT (information technology). Otherwise, workers "may go back in and really mess up stuff." The employers won't give people in payroll a chance to change records or IT managers to put in a virus. Sorry, but that's it.

Layoffs, which make up more than half of all involuntary terminations, are "really, really tough," Hubler says. "Especially if it's a manufacturing job or somebody in a warehouse, somebody on a forklift, a guard — you're taking away their family's income. I have less empathy for someone in my position who loses a job. I should be able to live on my savings. But the lower level, you

know they're paycheck to paycheck. It just breaks my heart. They didn't do anything wrong. It's the finances of the company. Maybe we lost a contract." During the 2002 recession, she says it "was horrible. I was laying off distribution people I knew were never going to find a job," at least not one that paid the same.

In human resources, Hubler says, the joke is, as soon as you make friends with coworkers, the next day you show up to fire them. At the Carlsbad office, she maintains a professional distance with her staff, avoiding all intimacies. If she has to can anyone, she sticks to the talking points. "You go by the numbers you need to reduce; you look at the head count to find where X amount of dollars can be saved; here's X amount of positions that need to go because we've lost clients, we've lost business, whatever."


It got so bad once that Hubler even laid herself off. She didn't mind, though, because she could plan for it, an advantage the other workers lacked. Another time, she laid herself off but made certain that when the company started rehiring, her name was at the top of the list. It was, and she got her position back. Despite the stigma, management has its privileges.

Mall Boys

HEY HANG at the

Orange Julius, the magazine rack at Waldenbooks, the video arcade in the basement of Sears. They range in age from 12 to 18 and have a few things in common; among them, a kind of expertise on the subject of San Diego shopping malls and bus schedules — but mostly it is a summer full of time on their hands.

Matt is 12 years old. He is a husky kid with closecropped curly hair bleached light at the ends from his hours skateboarding in the parking lots of Parkway Plaza, Grossmont Center, Mission Valley, Fashion Valley, even the distant and exotic Plaza Bonita. He leans forward on the bench, surrounded by his "mall friends," and turns his skateboard in his hands. A security guard walks by and eyes the board while Matt's 18year-old bench companion Ronnie (with shoulderlength hair, ash-smear of a mustache, and Slayer T-shirt) smokes a cigarette and blows smoke rings in the direction of the rent-a-cop. The security guy points a finger at Ronnie, works his thumb like the hammer of a pistol, and winks.

"He throwed me outta here for skateboarding one time, I think...was it him?" Matt turns to his friend David in a Chicago Cubs cap turned backward on his head. David tugs on the sleeves of his Bad Boy T-shirt.

"Nuh-uh. Another guy." A pink eruption of bubble gum blossoms from his mouth, engorges, then explodes with a crack that echoes through Parkway Plaza. "Let's get some baseball cards at Kay Bee." "I already did." "Yeah, but you didden

get nobody good." "So?"

Ronnie, the smoking elder with an unfortunate complexion, sneers at David, then Matt. "Baseball cards?" He turns away disgusted, takes a step from the bench as if denying any connection with the unhip. "Shit."

Two other boys are seated on the opposite bench. Matt introduces them and explains, "They come from like 60 miles from here."

Kevin and Justin are from a mountain resort town where their parents work. They also work part-time in, respectively, a motel and a grocery store. "I work the cash register," Justin says and turns sidewise. "Me and Kevin are stepbrothers. His dad owns the resort and our mom married him. We're off today, because we had to work Fourth of July." Justin is wearing thick glasses attached to his head with an elastic band. He wears a wide, diver's-type wristwatch that he keeps consulting. "We got to get a bus at 3:15 to go back. We wanted to go to

Grossmont and the Parkway Bowl."

"Yeah," Matt leaned back on the bench and spun the wheels of his skateboard. "Parkway Bowl is pretty cool. Good video games. The movies are old though. I saw *Hunt for the Red October* twice and *Pretty Woman* and *Milo and Otis. Pretty Woman* was kind of cool." He performs a Groucho-like undulation of his eyebrows to

many."

When asked what they did with the girls they met, David shrugged. "Look at stuff in the stores, get their phone numbers...see if they have any quarters."

What had their day been like so far? Matt again: "We went to Jack In The Box, then we went to Life's a Beach and looked at the stuff. Then we went to Kay Bee, and then we played Afterburner and



David, who blushes and looks down. Matt starts to sing, "Pretty woman... walkin' down the street...." He laughs and kicks out at David with his B.K. (British Knights) high-top sneakers. David dances away, his face suffused with blood. "You can meet more girls here though. Not as many as at Horton Plaza, but pretty Altered Beast and Sky Soldiers."

How much had he spent on video games today? Two dollars. Three yesterday. His allowance? \$15 a week.

Matt gets up. "We gotta go." It is unclear why. "Wanna go to the bookstore?" he asks Ronnie, the older boy's head now bracketed by a Walkman. Ronnie sneers, hitches

up his ragged Levis with his right hand in his pocket. "CHUNG CHUNG CHUNK!" He stabs at the younger boys with an air guitar he swings from his groin. David flinches away. "BOYOYOING!" Ronnie works the imaginary vibrato bar in a vigorous, suggestive whipping of his fist against his hip. "No?" Matt laughs, raises his eyebrows, crosses his eyes. "Okay. See ya."

From the psychology section of Waldenbooks, Kevin and Justin can be seen studying the paperback covers of fantasy novels in The Forgotten Realms series from TSR,

the Dungeons and Dragons publisher. Justin examines a thick tome titled Darkwalker on Moonshaye, and Kevin reads the first and last pages of Piers Anthony's Phaze Doubt.

Across the store, Matt is flipping through Thrasher magazine, while David sits cross-legged on the floor looking at the pictures in Cosmopolitan. David is crying quietly, one fist jammed against his tearing eyes, the other hand turning pages. Girls near his own age are depicted in miniskirts, makeup, cleavage, on beaches, in sports cars, brandishing champagne

glasses, their heads thrown back laughing or looking up in sultry invitation. He turns to Matt. "I'm not gonna come out with you anymore."

"So?" Matt doesn't look up from his skateboarding magazine.

"So nothing. I could slam you too."

"So, go ahead." Matt stuffs the magazine back in the rack and picks up a Batman comic from the revolving rack behind him. "The Dark Knight Returns!" He reads the title out loud.

"I'm gonna do it when you're not thinking about it." David puts Cosmo back, picks up the

novelization of Total Recall, looks at the pictures. Matt mocks him in a

sing-song, girly voice: "I'm gonna do it when you're not thinking about it."

Descending into the "Home Life" section of Sears, en route to the video arcade, one passes decorator urns, plaster animals, bedroom sets, mirrors. Kevin and David have linked up with three other boys and two girls, all approximately 11 to 13 years old. The girls are pretending to be asleep on a queen-sized mattress framed in brass posters.

One of them snores loudly. Kevin and one of the new boys crawl under a twin bed next to the queen. David is laughing from behind a bureau. Another boy jumps onto the bed with the girls and starts bouncing up and down between them. The girls scream, laughing. They run in two directions.

"Hey, you kids!" a salesman in a funny haircut, long-sleeved white shirt, and wide-striped tie waddles past refrigerators, microwaves, washers, dryers, his arm extended, his finger pointing ceilingward as if he is trying to hail a cab.

"Leslie, security!" The kids have scattered except for Kevin and the other boy

The girls, David, and another boy have bolted upstairs. As the salesman begins to ascend the stairwell, Kevin and a boy wearing a Bart Simpson T-shirt ("Underachiever and Proud of It") scuttle out from their hiding place. They run in a crouch, sprinting for the hair salon, tuxedo shop, and hearing-aid kiosk along the corridor leading to Fun Time, the videogame arcade. Kevin is in the lead. His face is red, his eyes tearing, he keeps both hands over his

mouth to keep from erupting in hysteria.

Fun Time is a darkened cubbyhole sandwiched between a watch repair and photo studio booth in a fluorescent corridor. Warbles, beeps, metallic recorded gunfire, laser blasts, and explosions fill the blackness. The faces of children from 4 to 18 are illuminated eerily from color screens stuttering with light. The faces are flushed, the eyes riveted, intent; sweat forms on fleshy cheeks and furrowed brows in a parody of adult anxiety. Kevin, Justin, David, Matt, Ronnie, and the girls are congregated in front of Crossbow and Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles video games. Ronnie seems to be the star of TMNT, and he holds his audience of preteens enraptured with his prowess.

One boy, maybe 10 years old, is Jason. He feeds dollars' worth of

quarters into Operation Wolf within five minutes. He works the Mac 10 machine pistol from side to side, cutting down scores of swarthy terrorists with joyless determination. He spends five to six hours a day either at Grossmont or at the Parkway Bowl. Five days a week. His allowance is 10 dollars a week. "I was at Family Fun Center yesterday," he says. As to where he might rather be other than shopping malls for the summer: "My dad keeps saying he'll take me to the beach on weekends, but he is usually working." Jason has been augmenting his allowance the past couple of weeks by selling off his baseball cards. "Some are worth one dollar or two dollars to some kids."

Matt and David are waiting for a bus on Fletcher Parkway. It is 5:10 p.m. Matt's face is sweaty, smudged with pizza, dirt

from his fingers, and what looks like chocolate. He leans back onto the bus stop bench, his skateboard held to his chest like a pet. His eyes are lidded, heavy. David leans forward off the bench, tosses baseball cards into his Cubs hat three feet away. "Pretty woman..." he sings softly to himself, "...walkin' down the street...." The number 858 (Grossmont College) bus arrives, and David scoops up his hat, returns Matt's cards to his Kay Bee bag. "See ya tomorrow, Fat Matt," David says and leaps aboard the bus quickly.

"See ya tomorrow," Matt returns sleepily, rubbing at his face with the heel of his right hand. Through the haze of bus exhaust rising into the late-afternoon heat, with plump arms crossed protectively over his skateboard, Matt closes his eyes and suddenly seems much younger than his dozen summers. — John Brizzolara

I AM LOOKING AT A JOB APPLICATION FOR JACK IN THE BOX

and trying to talk myself out of turning the thing in. I have enough Prozac to see me through this — it is a means to an end pure and simple, suck it up, just do it — and I need the job to pay for the Prozac that I'm going to need to do the job and so on.

How did this happen? I am 47 years old with no marketable skills other than guitar playing and prose writing. But Christmas was, as they say, just around the corner and, shit, so is Jack In The Box.

I can't live on what I make even if I get this job, but maybe I can stop some of the financial bleeding and get a couple of Christmas gifts. Maybe I can use the experience in a big, realistic novel about America in the '90s — sort of like *Bonfire of the Vanities*, only instead of a stockbroker, my character will be a fry cook. I am not kidding. Right in front of me is the guy you see on television at odd hours promising to bail you out of problems with bill collectors and the IRS. The "Debt Relief King" is right in front of me as I wait for the manager of Jack In The Box on Pearl Street in La Jolla.

As if in an out-of-body experience you hear about on the Sci-Fi Channel, I see myself crossing the distance to the table where the curly blond-haired lawyer is sucking on a soft drink, reading a paperback, and munching a sandwich. He appears unflappable, cool and secure in the knowledge that his finances are in order, his tax refund undoubtedly in the mail, and his credit card balance a manageable digit or two; his digestion is untroubled as he enjoys a sensibly frugal meal and a nonfiction bestseller.

Counselor Langlois is astounded at the outburst of this desperate gray-haired stranger with a bag of groceries, which have suddenly been tossed aside. He looks up with horror as I fall to my knees blubbering, "For Chrissakes, you gotta help me, Reed! I owe money!" I seize him by the lapels and shake him. His head whips forward and back like one of those dashboard dolls. "I don't wanna work at Jack In The Box! I'll do whatever you say...."

Luckily I snap out of it before I actually do any of this. The manager, a polite, pretty round girl in her early 20s, emerges from the back of the restaurant holding my application. She smiles at me tentatively and gestures me to a table by the window.

Her name is Edna. She finds it interesting that I'm a writer and play in a rock band. "Do you ever play around here?" she asks.

I nod and mention Java Joe's and the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art. She is more impressed by Java Joe's.

"That's where Jewel used to play," she says.

"Yes," I nod.

"What's the name of your band?" I tell her and she looks a little gaseous. She's never heard of us. "Well, it seems to me you're overqualified to work here." I should never have mentioned the museum gig. Or maybe she just means I'm too old. Of course, she can't say that. It's against the law. Age discrimination.

"No no. I'm really not qualified at all. Honestly. I've never worked in a fast-food restaurant. I have no idea what I'm doing."

"Well, I'm looking for someone who will stay on. How long would you work here?"

"Probably just for the holidays. I don't want to mislead you." I've probably blown it, but she seems so nice it wouldn't be right to tell her I have long-term fast-food ambitions with the corporation. She tells me she has two other applicants she is considering and she'll let me know. "Would you cut your sideburns?"

"Sure," I say and mean it.

Edna never calls. I return a few days later after cutting my sideburns back several inches. "See, I cut them?" I smile at her over the counter. She tells me she still hasn't made up her mind.

"So there's still a chance?" I am pathetic.

"There's a chance," she says but her smile is regretful. A Help Wanted sign on the flower stand next door gives me pause, but I know nothing about flowers and seem to have a knack for killing them, if anything. I don't even bother.

The next business over is "Pearl Wash." I can wash cars, all right. I've washed plenty of cars, just not for 30 years or so. The fact that Pearl Wash is manned by a platoon of mostly Mexican guys that might not welcome an old hippie Italian/gringo doesn't dissuade me. I can already picture myself, shirt off in the sun, getting in shape burnishing Jags and BMWs, bopping to norteño music with my homies, the carnauba wax glistening on my flabby pecs. I ask for an application. Abe, the manager, looks me up and down and warns me, "It's hard work."

"I can do hard work," I assure him.

"For how long?" He grins.

"How long is the shift?"

"Eight to five with a half hour to an hour for lunch."

"Sure. Just give me a chance." I grin back at him, but I'm already feeling my back give out. I can just see these swarthy young bucks laughing, cracking Geritol jokes. "Try me out." God, I'm begging.

"Maybe I'll call you." Abe doesn't sound convinced. I feel like I've just tried to pick him up in a bar, and he's too polite to say he doesn't find me attractive.

Abe never calls. Fine. There's lots of jobs. I can wash dishes at the International House of Pancakes down the street. How can I not get that job? The economy is doing great. Jobs are everywhere. I grab an application, fill it out, and return. They never call. I refuse to be discouraged this easily. With newfound determination I walk into Taco Bell, and this is where I get lucky.

Anyway, I meet Lucky. The solid, gentle juggernaut of a man leans across the counter and presents me with an application in a meaty hand the color of devil's food cake. He also wears one of those Madonna microphones in order to take orders from La Jolla's only remaining drive-thru window (the girl at Jack In The Box wore hers to communicate only from the counter to the kitchen) since the local ordinance back in 1969, I believe. Lucky fixes me with one eye (the other is slightly lazy, maybe even glass) and extends his free hand in an offer to shake. He tells me to return the application early the following day. I am buoyed with prospects: I decide I will be promoted to the drive-thru window position at the earliest opportunity. Within months I will no doubt be perceived as assistant-manager material.

Lucky is not there the next day or the day after that. He leaves a message for me, however. He says he will call, but two days go by and there is no call. I begin to feel hurt and foolish. I was certain that Lucky and I had shared a moment back there over a handshake.

The following day I drop in at Taco Bell and Lucky apologizes, explaining that he had been off for two days. I tell him no problem. I will not make the same mistakes I made at Jack In The Box and the car wash. My air is that of a man on the go, with great expectations, places to go, people to see, I was just in the neighborhood and thinking about a Number 7 Value Meal and....I am asked if I can start tomorrow, Christmas Eve. I look at my watch

as if I'm unsure. "Tomorrow? I can come by, sure."

"See you at 11:00 a.m."

I will never make fun of anyone working in a fast-food joint again, and neither should you. This work is relentless and demanding. It is scientific, exacting, and at times, hard on the back. Mexican Pizzas alone are the result of precision teamwork, rigorous preparation, and multiple tasks --- they do not appear at the drivethru window by magic, that's for sure.

My first day I pretty much sit outside at a table, smoke cigarettes, and read the Systems Operation Manual and its sequel, Receiving, Storing, and Preparing Food. I am given two lengthy tests on this material in the Trainee Workbooks. After four hours I have a good theoretical knowledge of the Frymaster, the Rethermalizer, and the Consistency Template for beans. Watching the Christmas Eve traffic on La

Jolla Boulevard, the surfers and lifeguards coming and going from the Marine Street beach, the tourists from all over the world and schoolchildren alight with the promise of Christmas, I am struck with the solemn charge the Pepsi- Cola Company (owner of Taco Bell) has given its employees. The general public is blissfully unaware of the pains taken with, for example, the ground beef in their burritos: the 30-minute preparation time until the hearty, nutritious meat product - precooked and packaged in Mexico by workers so dedicated they put in twice as many hours for half the money we make up here — is "evenly broken up with no lumps: not tough, mushy, or chewy." The color consistently a "...medium brown with red and orange tones from spices" and maintained at a steady, bactericidal 190 degrees. Indeed, the public does not pause to think of these things, and we at Taco Bell don't feel that you should have to.

The day after Christmas is my second shift, and this time I'm doing actual work. Way too much of it. Dressed in my white T-shirt with that frightening little lemurfaced Chihuahua saying "Yo quiero Taco Bell!" and a corporate-issue jalapeñopepper baseball cap into which I have stuffed all of my hair, I am ready to work the cash register — only not quite.

I quickly learn that almost no one orders food

the way the computer wants us to. I must constantly modify, for example, a Burrito Supreme (which is a bean and cheese burrito with onions, sour cream, and tomatoes) to a Burrito Supreme minus onions or with extra cheese — I must punch in BS - ON + CHwhich renders the thing, you see, not a Burrito Supreme at all. The same with Gorditas and Fajitas, often confused (one has Fiesta Sauce, the other Southwestern Sauce: for Supremes add sour cream and tomatoes) with extra steak or chicken, no peppers or onions, three-cheese combo instead of just cheese, raspberry iced tea is ICED TEA + RED. No Coke, Pepsi. For lemonade you have to press ICED TEA + BLUE or something like that. The permutations are endless and things can get backed up and confused very quickly, especially since no one speaks English very well except me and Lucky.

Esterania, a shy and smiley girl with striking eyes, rescues me from the cash register and suggests I wash dishes instead. This goes pretty well for a while; the simple rhythm of detergent sink, sanitizer sink, and rinse sink is pretty self-explanatory, but I screw this up as well. After an hour I have washed, rinsed, and sanitized cubing knives, "burger sauce stripper tools,""modular keepers," "false-bottomed corn and bean salsa containers," lids and pans from the steam-table line, spatulas, cinnamon twist basket fryers, and a dozen plastic sour cream and guacamole guns, which I have not, apparently, cleaned thoroughly enough: a pocket of soapy, watery green or white glop from previous use remains in the vacuum advance chambers. I am busted and the lunch rush is cranking up to disturbing proportions. I am yanked from the sinks and placed "on the line."

Miguel, Rene, and Esterania do what they can to explain to me how to fill and wrap tacos, burritos, bake Mexican pizzas in 35 seconds, cut them into fours,

distribute green onions and shredded lettuce evenly so that all flavors are experienced uniformly in every bite. It is not long before I am cursing in Spanish and shift manager Carmen explains to me that pinche is not a Spanish word. I am to reach with both hands for a full pinch of lettuce, a quarter pinch of either threecheese or regular cheese, a quarter pinch of tomatoes or onions, and I am chanting"Pinche cebollas, pinche tres quesos..." et cetera. Within minutes I am breaking taco shells, wrapping them in burrito paper, putting pizza sauce on cinnamon twists, mixing orders, bagging dining-room meals and sending drive-thru orders to the window on "for here" trays. I am now Lucille Ball in that I Love *Lucy* episode where she is trying to keep up with a conveyor belt full of chocolates by stuffing them into her mouth. I am eating shards of tortillas, licking frijoles off of my fingers, and filling iced tea requests with Mountain Dew. Lucky

pulls me from the line.

Lucky is a formidablelooking guy. He's got to weigh in around 250 or so and has a rolling gait that implies both an irresistible force and an immovable object. His manner is that of a benevolent drill sergeant: patient and precise, but unquestionably a guy you don't want to piss off. "We'll put you at the drivethru register next week. You only have to make change, drinks, and ask people if they want hot, mild, or fire sauce."

What he is saying, basically, is, Don't worry, we'll find something you won't fuck up. In the meantime he turns me over to Juan, who has me mop the floors. Every hour at Taco Bell, whether it's needed or not, the floors are cleaned and surfaces are wiped down (red Handi-Wipes for the dining room, blue ones for the prep and storage areas, or "backstage"). While mopping, I have a little time for my mind to wander.


I am thinking about a North County cocktail party

I am invited to attend New Year's Eve. I am dressed in a tuxedo with a drink in my hand. A blonde babe in a black evening gown, encrusted with diamonds, is taking note of the trim form beneath my cummerbund. I am in good shape from hefting boxes of frozen chicken and ground beef, slinging a mop and scouring the Frymaster. When she asks me what I do for a living I tell her, "I'm with Pepsi-Cola, restaurant division. La Jolla." She purrs and drapes herself on my arm as I critically note the consistency of the bean dip and make a witty remark about the caterer's not "knowing beans."

"Don't drag the bucket all over the restaurant," Lucky is yelling across the room. "Just take the mop and carry it back and forth!"

My next shift involves chopping green onions, filling backup trays of meat, beans, and cheese, loading the guacamole and cream guns, and placing tortillas in the warmer. I write the prep time, the time expected on the line, and expiration time (after consulting the wall chart) along with my name and the date on all of these things. Next task is the Frymaster.

I am instructed by Miguel on loading the vat with a white Crisco-like lard substance (though it is not lard; no one really knows what it is) and dipping taco salad shells, tortillas, and cinnamon crisps (little churros) for exactly the right amount of time: respectively, 30 seconds, 25 seconds, and, if I recall correctly, one minute. It is an arcane form of artistry, getting those taco salad shells into exactly the right configuration. Several failures are involved. I quickly eat as many of the rejects as possible while Lucky is in the office. But these are giant tortillas and I'm now standing in a generous deadfall of large crumbs and shards. I quickly grab a broom and go to work on the floor around my ankles just as Lucky comes out of the office and nods at me with approval. "When you're done





with that, fry up the cinnamon twists. Miguel will show you how."

After frying the hard little pastries that look exactly like uncooked fusilli pasta (which blow up to resemble pork rinds), dusting them with cinnamon sugar, and then bagging them in plastic, I'm back on the register under Miguel's supervision.

I wait on a few customers, punch in their orders, make change and drinks - nothing too difficult. I am surprised to see so many Mexican families coming in for this food. Don't get me wrong, it's decent food, inoffensive certainly, and it will probably keep you alive, but as Mexican food goes, it is about as ho-hum as you can get — and the portions are tiny. Still, it's wonderfully cheap and I guess that's what we've got going for us.

One elderly man comes in and jokes with Juan about the newness of the \$20 bill he is paying with. Something about how the bill is good because he just made it himself. Juan laughs dutifully but I doubt he has any idea what the guy said. The customer studies the menu though, Miguel tells me, the man comes in every day and should long ago have memorized its contents. The old gentleman seems to be relishing his decision and anticipation, enjoying his one-sided English banter with Juan and Miguel, who do not mind; the store is empty. Even if it were not, the two younger men would take as much time with him as he wanted. It occurs to me that this is a very important social ritual for the customer, something Juan and Miguel understand implicitly.

Everyone is working much harder than I am, and I am working harder than I want to. My fellow employees are indulgent with me but cannot conceal a mild amusement that an old gringo is working here. Everyone knows gringos can't work worth

a shit. Not really. And I sense their curiosity, an unspoken question in the fried, foody air: Shouldn't you be golfing or something?

* * *

The second to the last day of December I am, against all logic, promoted to the drive-thru window during the lunch rush. I am in a kind of toll booth with a cash register and a soda dispenser, boxes of hot sauce, napkins, straws, forks, and drink holders, all at the end of a conveyor belt on which food orders crawl toward me. Outside a parade of cars is snaking around the building, pulling up next to my window, their drivers extending fistfuls of cash.

"One large Slice." Hand them the covered drink with a straw. "That will be \$3.85. Hot sauce, mild, or fire sauce?" Punch in the amount they've given me, no need to worry about figuring change, the computer does it. I'm on a roll, I've got a rhythm going,



"Bye, Lucky."





I am late to the first Gulf War protest, the one before the war officially starts. It's dusk, and as I cross Broadway and pass the hollow pillars of the Federal building, there is already the rhythmic thumping of somebody's African drum, backed by a thick echo of cheering. I come around the corner onto dark, milling hundreds, a harassed-sounding voice ringing through a PA system. The air has cooled and smells of incense. A girl twirls in circles, then skips off through the crowd, shaking a tambourine.

They stand, wearing tie-dyed T-shirts and military surplus, in little sign-waving clusters at the perimeter or pressed against each other's backs near the platform full of speakers. It's been 20 years since I have seen so much hair in one place, so many paisleyed and batiked cotton skirts, so many loose breasts. Friends are bearhugged with loving howls — "Hiiii! You *made* it!" — tagboard signs compared and exclaimed over. Chants swell and die; a line of counter-protesters across the street is shooed onto the sidewalk by police. Women waft past me in clouds of patchouli, long earrings flashing. People smile radiantly, kiss, massage each other's shoulders. A floodlight on the platform bleaches out the faces of those striding through it (barefooted, ankles festooned with tiny jingling bells). Young faces, excited by the seriousness of their purpose.

Is there really a sign here that says "War is not healthy for children and other living things"? I have not seen this slogan since we colored it on stones with paints made from wildflowers, 20 years ago. Yes, it's there, being raised and lowered in time to an off-key rendition of "Give Peace a Chance." Two rippling-tressed boys smoke a joint off to one side, their jeans torn at the knees and embroidered on the asses.

The call goes up via bullhorn to begin the march down Front Street. Flashlights are flicked on, white candles and more sticks of incense are hurriedly passed and lighted. I do not join in. Newspaper editorials say that people of my age group — nearing 30 — are conservative. But it's simply that I have seen it all before. The clothes and hair and slogans, the freeness of the bodies, all are symbols resurrected

from my childhood, and they still don't mean peace and harmony.

In my mind I see a woman dancing in a dark and crowded room, long brown hair swinging around her shoulders, strands of it curved against her damp forehead. Her arms beat the air above her head, descend to twist around her undulating stomach, outline the rocking of her hips. In-a-gadda-da-vida, honey, don't you know that I lo-ove you.... Her dark eyes are half closed against the sting of pot and cigarettes. In-a-gadda-da-vida, honey, don't you know that I'll always be tru-ue.... She is panting in time to her hips. Sweat runs down from where she has tied her gauze shirt under her breasts, and it rolls into her low-slung jeans. One of her ornate brass earrings has swung up and caught in her hair. She snaps her head sideways and runs long fingers through the tangle, always moving; it's a kind of contest between her and the music and the wine

she drank. Her thighs ache, her stomach burns, she moves and moves.

I imagine this scene from what my mother has told me of how she spent her nights out when I was little. The song lasted the whole side of the album. She was high as a kite. She danced nonstop. The other people in the room were friends from her college art classes. She was avoiding home, where my sister and father and I were. The marriage was falling apart and she had gone into therapy, was getting fucked by her shrink. She spent a lot of time in her

bedroom with her door shut, crying. My mother removed herself by degrees from our middle-class tract house, our neighborhood's PTA housewives and welders and four-wheel-drive clubs. She founded a local chapter of NOW, began reading Psychology Today and Ms. Her closest new friends belonged to a group called TORI — "Trust, Open-ness, Response-Ability, Interdependence." When she took us with her to see them — couldn't get a babysitter, our father was out of town — we found their houses were old and full of antiques,

plants, and home-baked bread. The men did not wear suits. The women wore ethnic jewelry, kept journals, made sculptures. These people were forever hugging each other while rocking back and forth. There was a lot of touching. My mother spent long hours in intense conversation with them, and my sister Jean and I explored their strange houses, played games. She didn't bother about us, and we stayed up much later than we were used to. The changes in our mother meant fewer rules for us, more fun.

This was in my mind

when we moved to San Diego: freedom, newness. It was spring 1972. The three of us, luggage, two cats, and a litter box crammed in a dark green Volkswagen beetle drove south. Tinny AM car radio blasted "Time of the Season." I'd finished third grade the previous week; my school records were in the glove compartment with my mother's divorce papers. We drank Tab and laughed over National *Lampoon*, a magazine my sister and I were excited to be allowed to read. In San Diego, our mother found us a place to stay with friends –

people from a group called the Mandala Society. They were professional-types with good manners and quiet habits. I remember a man named Dave who wore a Rajneesh pendant over burgundy-colored velour shirts. There was a piano in his living room, lots of bookcases, an Oriental rug. Surrounded by such familiar comforts, meditation and the concept of transcendence through the contemplation of pretty geometric patterns were not difficult for my sister and me to accept. Besides, we were getting used to not understand-

ing things: Vietnam, the generation gap, psychedelia.

There was talk of starting a commune, purchasing a mansion at Sunset Cliffs where 15 of us would live together, but the money never materialized. Instead our mother moved us to an apartment on University, near 55th. We complained about the cockroaches, the stink of the gas oven, the cold tile floor. Our apartment filled up with plants in macramé hangers our mother made, incense, candles on brick-andboard shelves. On the shelves were books about

We began to see that world we had come from, our father's world, as allied with conservatism and the sort of limitations to freedom our mother now rolled her eyes at. She some-

exotic names like Whispering Moon Cloud. We made and ate what we called Super Atomic Health Food cookies. We did not delve into exotic cuisines, however, since government food commodities did not lend themselves to that.

times took our side against the bureaucracy of the school system, called us in sick when we weren't, boycotted PTA meetings and open houses. She dated a lot then. Her first steady boyfriend in San Diego was a bearded divorcé

who wore peasant blouses and silver-andturquoise jewelry — they took a massage class together and practiced on my sister and me. They took us camping or out to play in a friend's Jacuzzi.

Our mother's hair was brown and, until we moved to San Diego, worn shoulder length and smoothed back with a headband. She got a "gypsy" cut then — done in front of the bathroom mirror by pulling her hair forward onto her forehead, securing it an inch from the ends with a rubber band, and cutting the ends off. She wore long, dangly earrings and heavy silver rings she made herself in college art classes. Her glasses changed from cat-eyes to thick-framed tortoise oblongs, which she was forever breaking and repairing with Band-Aids and safety pins. Her body went into jeans and flower-printed nylon

shirts with big collars and cuffs, worn bra-less, or was draped in wraparound paisley skirts or Mexican wedding dresses or long caftans she sewed herself and embroidered on the sleeves and bodices. She often sat with us while we did our homework, embroidering or stitching beads onto jeans, onto blue chambray work shirts.

After a few months, our mother moved us to an apartment on 43rd Street, south of University. Two L-shaped Huffman buildings facing each other, finished in beige stucco and black wrought iron. It was newer and cleaner; it had green shag carpeting and a chandelier in the dining alcove. My sister and

I shared one bedroom, Mom had the other. She made her room up to resemble an Arabian tent. Turquoise and lavender fabric draped the ceiling and ran down the walls, punctuated by photos of naked men she clipped from Viva and Playgirl. 



The name of my inner spirit, my "inner Christ," came to me as I sat between my mother and sister during a group channeling ses-

sion. The lights were dimmed. There were perhaps 30 people on folding chairs in a circle. After opening relaxation exercises and a meditation in which we "closed our auras to all but the Christ vibration" (a precaution against invasion by evil spirits), the group leader asked us to speak the names of our personal guides. One by one the people paused, exhaled, said the strange names; I grew increasingly worried about what I would say. My mother went before me. "Ama," she said. It was my turn. I didn't think about it. I just said, "Iya."



Premier San Diego **"TUBA" specialist** Thousands of happy patients! Sunday in purple leotards and paisley skirts to a Moody Blues song called "Om." There were evening classes - I took Inner Sensitivity Training I & II, where I was taught how to write "treatments." These were nine-step prayers written out on paper and meditated over. Anything we wanted, the message was, was ours to have if we could just focus our spiritual energy properly. At the age of nine, this seemed a step up from fairy tales. It was real magic, that adults believed in. To work the magic, you had only to be true to yourself, nonjudgmental, open to all experiences.

Walking home from fourth grade once, I ran into one of TIC's directors coming out of a store. The neighborhood was frightening to me. Even then there were homeless people on the bus benches, winos, men who'd approach you with suspicious-sounding requests. So I felt happy as he held my hand and walked with me back to the church building. He walked me as far as the alley behind the building that led toward our apartment. He bent over me, put his arms around me, and

kissed my cheek. "If you were a little older and I were a little younger," he said, "we could meet somewhere in the middle and have a beautiful thing."

Our mother did not express any skepticism about the concepts we were introduced to at TIC. Astral travel, reincarnation, crystal power - why not? She consulted psychics, had her tarot cards read. We bought tarot decks ourselves and practiced on each other. Astrology had been mainstreamed for several years by this point, and the three of us often commented on

each other's typical Capricorn or Leo or Sagittarius behavior. When I was sick, my mother helped me to visualize white light. When Jean or I were angry with her, our mother accused us of "trying to lay a guilt trip" on her. Guilt, like obligation and responsibility, was considered a destructive concept. It belonged to the world of father and school, bills, rules.

TIC held aura-reading sessions. And there were "table-tippings," in which a group of people sat around a table and got in contact with spirits of various kinds. Though the names are lost to me now, I remember one named Babasomething - whose energy caused the table to rock back and forth under the guiding hands of those seated around it. I heard a bluebird channeled once. I heard strange languages like Gaelic spoken by people who claimed to have no knowledge of them. During group outings to Black's Beach, we decorated our naked bodies with seaweed and danced

We went on weekend mountain retreats, sometimes with TIC

in the surf.


people, sometimes with TORI people. Children tended to be shunted off at these functions, left to their own devices except at bedtime. The adults sat cross-legged on the floor, talking intensely, hitting pillows, giving massages, hugging each other. Late at night, there was body-painting and pot.

Jean and I would catch sight of our mother walking in the woods, clad in a suede coat lined with sheepskin, face stained with tears. When I succeeded in getting my mother's attention, I showed her drawings I'd made. As I

got older, these were very often drawings of the floor plans of houses. Sometimes palaces, sometimes cozy little homes. Elaborate, multileveled homes with all the different types of windows and doors I could think of.

In my mind, I see my sister standing in front of our bedroom window. It's the middle of the night. She is naked; the floodlights on the park-


ing spaces outside outline her body in bluish light. She is very quiet. I can't hear her breathe. Her arms are above her head; the window curtains are draped apart over her forearms. Her palms are pressed against the glass. Very slowly, she steps up onto the narrow window sill and wedges her bare feet into the lower corners. She leans her forehead against the window pane and stares out over the roofs of the houses to the west.

I remember the sounds of my sister waking up. Yawning, popping joints, thumping on the floor in a yoga exercise called "salute to the sun." The bathroom door would close; I listened to the water running and to the vigorous brushing Jean gave her braces. When hangers clicked in the closet, I'd turn over and ask, "What are you gonna wear?" We shared our clothes low-riding bell-bottomed jeans, bell-sleeved blouses, knit vests. We talked then about our dreams of the night before. Flying dreams, animal dreams, runningwith-stuck-feet dreams. Dreams where we battled gangsters or tricked them into leaving us alone.

I watched Jean in the bathroom brushing her hair, long and straight and dirty blonde. I was becoming envious of her. Her hair was longer and thicker. She was cultivating long fingernails. She was growing breasts. As we grew older and started spending our summer vacations at the beach (every day, an hour busing there, an hour back), her tan was darker, her hips slimmer.

I listened from my bed to her muffled breakfast conversations with my mother, a peevish teen's bargainings for spare change and less housework and later hours. She'd come in to grab her school books, her detested orthodontic headgear, and scold me out of bed. Then she'd leave to catch the number seven bus down University, walk up over the 54th Street hill to Horace Mann Junior High.

I was dependent upon Jean for my opinions and attitudes. She was the trailblazer, the tester of things. Her thinking, in turn, was a trickle-down of our mother's thinking. All those little details of dress and decor that belonged to our new life were attached to ideas, assumptions about who

If you wore huaraches and hooded shirts made out of old flour sacks, you hung out at the beach. If you hung out at the beach, you probably smoked pot. If you smoked pot, you had rejected traditional means of subsistence. So you were cool — okay by us.

Jean studied French, went roller-skating in the park, ate brown-bag lunches with her girlfriends in the quad. She grew away from me. She came to spend most afternoons at her friend Maria's house, most evenings talking to her on the phone. The two sometimes met up just to wander the neighborhood, maybe shoplift some cosmetics from the Rexall Drugstore on the corner.

She was most mine when we were alone together, times that became more infrequent with each passing year. We still danced and acted out scenes from musicals together. We made up television commercials while we did the dishes: "This grease is so stubborn!" "No need to get pissed about it. Why don't you try Joy?" "I'm not into that new-age stuff...." In her less selfconscious moments, she still played dolls with

me, but our games were rougher: Barbie plunging to her death from the top of the bureau, Ken making it with another doll and Barbie shooting him in a jealous rage.

Between us came boyfriends and what I saw as Jean's condescending assumption of a more parental role with me. I borrowed money from her; she yelled at me for spending it on candy bars. She put a curse on me, a TICderived proclamation that in later years I ridiculed her for: "I say this now and so it shall be; you'll never spend a dime wisely in your life!" I lost a ring my grandmother had given me; she found it and suspended it from a string near a door jamb, while I searched for a week.

When Jean made friends with Maria, who attended TIC with her family and lived nearby, I made friends with Maria's younger sister Rachel.

In my mind, I see Maria and Rachel taking us home for the first time. The first thing we see is their mother Rita's harp. The light in the living room is buttery, thick with dust particles. The harp stands at an angle in front of an unused fireplace on a threadbare dhurrie rug. Its gilt sur-



saved enough money — Rachel's favorite was a scene of Disney characters in a cartoonish pastoral setting, fucking.

When Maria and Rachel had grown to trust us, we were told that Rita held Sexual Freedom League parties at their house. Sometimes the girls spent the night elsewhere, sometimes they stayed in their rooms while the orgies took place. 

chapters aloud. We spied on the Knights of Columbus next door, staked out a mysterious warehouse down the block that we were sure was run by the Mob. There was a treasure hunt game, in which we paired off and left clues for each other around the neighborhood, until someone on the street caught on and began following us. If we were in a particularly daring mood, we ran past Scotty's Bar on University and pushed open the door.

As we grew older the club split up. Maria and Jean would spend hours sequestered behind closed doors, telling secrets. Rachel and I went to school together briefly, before I was transferred across town. We played with our dolls, made houses for them out of chairs and record album covers, made up fantasies in which we'd shrink the teachers we hated and

imprison them in our doll houses. We read fantasy books together and imagined traveling through time, meeting our parents when they were children. We tried communicating with each other via telepathy (followed by a phone call: "Did you feel me thinking about you just now?").

By the time I was 12 and Jean was 15, our mother had finished with TIC and TORI and the Mandala Society. The friends she had made scaled off of her like skin, in layers. We ask her whatever happened to so-and-so. "Oh, him. Probably busted for drugs by now. Did I ever tell you how he came on to me at that party?" Her affairs became longer, her boyfriends more "establishment." Positive visualization, astral travel, reincarnation were discarded, like the long gowns and ethnic necklaces she relegated first to her bottom drawer, then to cardboard boxes in her closet, then to us for costumes in school plays. Our efforts to remain what we called "open" gave way; openness was cast off with our sand candles and yoga exercises.

Maria telephoned me a couple of months ago. We hadn't spoken in 13 years. She had looked up my father, and he gave her my number. Her voice was the same — watery, smiling. She was living in the Bay Area and had just given birth. Unfortunately, she told me, she and the child's father were "cycling out," she said, when she went into labor. "I call it cycling out; what I mean is he's manic depressive like me, and we both ended up getting locked up that weekend." She was calling to tell me that her child is an angel, sent to Earth to bring people together. – Kathy Miller

Wild Blue Yonder

Condor Reintroduction Plans

he condor release sites are chosen for a variety of reasons," says the Wild Animal Park's curator of birds Michael Mace. "[We must get the birds] in a location that is very remote so they will not be around people, and we also have to take into account the ability to service that facility [local staff must be able to reach the site]. We look at wind direction and thermals — the birds use those to fly around, so they can easily traverse the area — and we make sure food sources are available."

of the Sierra Club's San Diego chapter.

The California condor's wingspan of up to ten feet makes it the largest flying bird in North America. The endangered birds reached their lowest point in 1982 when only 22 were accounted for in the world. Condors have few natural predators, and the bird's near extinction was the result of factors including pesticides like DDT (which thins the eggshells), collision with power lines, and poaching of eggs. In 1987, "A landmark decision was made to bring all the birds in from the wild to two facilities the San Diego Wild Animal Park and the Los Angeles Zoo," says Mace. "Since that time [our facility has] produced 128 chicks, and there are now over 270 condors in the world.

Four breeding facilities yield around 30 chicks a year. In the wild, a pair of condors

produces one chick every two years. With the use of "puppet rearing," condor biologists are able to double the number of offspring in captivity. When a condor couple produces an egg, scientists remove that egg and put it in an incubator. The condors then produce a second "replacement egg." When the egg in the incubator hatches, it is raised with the use of a puppet made to resemble a mature condor. "This way," says Mace, "the birds never see people, they just see the puppet, so they know they are a condor during their impressionable period."

Both at the hatching facilities and at the release sites, "mentors" (adult condors that behave as a condor should) are used to teach chicks how to survive on their own. "Youngsters are integrated with mentors and start to learn skills. They watch the adult bird forage for food and watch how the adult behaves." A chick may stay in the aviary with a mentor from one month to six months. The aviaries at the release sites allow chicks to grow accustomed to the climate. Also, "The mentor stays back [in the aviary] and serves as a beacon for chicks to know where they can come back to so they don't get too far off on their own and get into some kind of trouble, like getting lost."

The two primary release sites in California are located in Ventura County and Big Sur. The San Diego facility's release site is located 7000 feet up in the San Pedro de Mártir Mountains in Baja California, a seven-hour drive from the border. It takes three to four hours to reach the site by car from the nearest town. "As a condor flies, that's not a long distance," says Mace. "In Arizona the birds travel more than 200 miles a day." A total of 16 condors have been released at the Baja site over the past four years.

"Since its inception, going back to the early '80s, the entire project has [cost] somewhere around the 20- and 30-milliondollar range," says Mace. Including all departments (e.g., research division, behavioral division, pathology department), San Diego's facility requires "around a quarter of a million dollars a year." This money comes from ticket sales to the San Diego Wild Animal Park and Zoo and donations.

Released condors have been reproducing on their own, hatching and raising approximately five chicks a year between California and Arizona. "That number will grow exponentially as [the birds] mature." Chicks do not reach sexual maturity for at least 5 years, but their lifespan is 60 years. Condors are social animals; outside of the breeding season, which is the first half of the year, they congregate in larger numbers (eggs are usually produced in January, take almost two months to hatch, and at least another five months before the chick will leave the nest).

"In general, condors are an incredibly hardy species," Mace points out. "They live a very long time," and their strong immune system keeps them from becoming sick from bacteria found in the rotting carcasses Baja condor

on which they feed. "But with that said, they're also very vulnerable to the environmental issues that affect all of us. We're not saying not to develop, just [that people should] take into account all of the things that [can be done] to be responsible in a community. Using California as an example, if you just preserve and manage effectively the property that condors live on, there are fifty other endangered species [living there] — they may not be as well known or charismatic, but if you take care of the one you know about, there are plants, reptiles, other birds, and more that will benefit as well."



As you drive Interstates 8 or 805 near Mission Valley, look for the rust tint these flowers give to the steep hillsides. soms of every intermediate shade from yellow to red.

Star Jasmine's sweet perfume, exuded from clusters of small, white flowers, will continue to scent San Diego's spring breezes until sometime in June. Not a true jasmine, or *Jasminum*, star jasmine belongs to the genus *Trachelospermum*. In both public and private spaces, it has been widely planted as an ornamental ground cover and as a trellised vine.

Desert Agaves, or century plants, are sending up their asparagus-like flower stalks on rocky hillsides throughout much of the Anza-Borrego Desert. On warm, sunny days the stalks may grow almost one foot per day (fast enough for you to notice the sharp leaf tips at the bud actually separating from one another). After the stalk reaches a height of 10–20 feet, clusters of waxy, yellow flowers appear, ready for pollination by bees and other insects. After blooming, the fleshy, dagger-like leaves at the base of the plant die (after a life of 10 or 20 years, not a century) and the stalk, bearing a crop of seeds, dries up as well.

he classic grand tour of Malibu Creek State Park's backcountry includes upper Malibu Canyon and circles high above on the crest of the beautiful Santa Monicas — L.A.'s coastal mountain range. From Highway 101 take Las Virgenes Road 3.2 miles south to the Malibu Creek State Park entrance on the right. Beyond the pay station, park in the main day-use lot (open 8 a.m. until dusk).

Now head west on unpaved Crags Road. After 0.4 mile you cross over Malibu Creek. A right at the fork in the road just beyond leads you more directly to the park's

visitor center (open on weekends). Beyond the visitor center, cross Malibu Creek again and con-

tinue up and over a hill on Crags Road. Press on past silted-in Century Lake on the left: the Goat Buttes, also on the left; and through the M*A*S*H site, where outdoor scenes for the television series were recorded.

After a total of 2.7 miles, bear left on Bulldog Road, a fire road/powerline access road. The road rises crookedly along

slopes thickly clothed in chaparral. The physical effort of negotiating the last, steep, uphill mile on Bulldog Road is rewarded by ever-expanding views over and beyond the now-shrunken-looking Goat Buttes. You'll also pass close to some interesting outcrops of sandstone, looking much like gigantic incisor teeth.

Turn left when you reach Castro Peak Road at 5.8 miles, and start a descent east. The Malibu shoreline soon comes into view, with a clear-air vista that includes several of the Channel Islands. Palos Verdes, and the west and south parts of the L.A. Basin.

As you approach the Corral Canyon Road trailhead, stay left on the footpath that goes up a hogback ridge bristling with sandstone pinnacles (bikers should stay on the roadways instead of taking the footpath). Stay on this ridge for 0.5 mile, passing several gargantuan sandstone outcrops. You then meet Mesa Peak Fire Road, which doubles as a segment of the Backbone $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Trail}}\xspace - {\mathsf{a}}$ trail that spans the length of the Santa Monica Mountains.

At 9.4 miles there's a junction. A road to Mesa Peak goes right; you bear left, staying on the Mesa Peak Fire Road. You now begin a steady and sometimes severe descent along the precipitous west wall of Malibu Canyon. This is a potentially knee-banging drop for runners, and a tricky descent for mountain bikes. Malibu Creek and the curving highway through it come into view occasionally, seemingly straight down. You end up at a parking lot for the Backbone Trail along Malibu Canvon Road at 11.8 miles.

Follow Malibu Canyon Road north, passing over Malibu Creek, and enter

She's got a telegraphic command of body language - her characters' faces are simplified to the point where their eyes are usually just dots - and the backgrounds nicely evoke the architecture and heat of Mexico City. What really makes the story compelling, though, is Abel's sensitivity to character and dialogue - Carla is the narrator, but she's hardly a heroine, and the way crucial

Between Lucidity And Senility

hen Sarah Schorr applies for a secretarial job at the cluttered office of Judge Francis Biddle, she walks into living history. If she didn't know who he was, she'd think he's a compulsive name-dropper. Oliver

Wendell Holmes, Zora Neale Hurston, Hermann Wilhelm Goering — the names trip off his tongue. But Sarah knows all about the former U.S. Attorney General

under FDR and chief American judge of the International Military Tribunal at Nuremburg. So when he tells her a silver letter opener was a gift from Henry James to his mother in 1905, Sarah doesn't bat an eve.

Now 81, Biddle's tongue also trips. He can remember events of 50 years past as if watching a movie but couldn't tell you where he put his coat. He knows he hasn't long to live, which is why he hired Sarah. Part blunt curmudgeon, part senile, part poet, the judge has been tough on previous secretaries. Little does he know: Sarah can be tough on famous judges.

When she was 11, her father lost his prestigious job to alcohol. In the process, she says, "He lost his identity.'

"Not unusual," Biddle replies. "Equating oneself with one's title is a particularly male affliction." You can pretty much tell where Joanna McClelland Glass's Trying is headed with one eye tied behind your back. The title's a giveaway. clutter on his desk). That she becomes pregnant adds a facile death/new-life symbolic arc as well. What you might not anticipate are the moment-to-moment

interchanges in which nothing — and quite a - happens. lot -

Most plays illustrate the growth of an identity. You see the making of so-and-so, the courageous feats or tragic falls that come to define a person. In Trying, Sarah's identity is still forming; her life is late in Act One. Judge Biddle's in his denouement; he fights a losing battle not to develop himself further but, as chunks fade into ether, to retain who he was.

You could say that Trying lacks drama in the conventional sense. There's so little, in fact, the Globe production throws in sound bytes from Great Events. The real drama happens between the lines, as Sarah and the judge team up to "rally" a life that has regressed from the world stage to smaller and smaller rooms - and the judge wondering which will be his last.

Question: most actor training involves making

characters cohere, giving them some sort of consistency. But what if yours doesn't? Answer: watch Jonathan McMurtry at the Cassius Carter. Judge Biddle's so arthritic he can barely move (it hurts to watch him drag his left leg, with a metal pin in the ankle, up the stairs). And his mind, which functions "somewhere between lucidity and senility," has become nonlinear. It flits about, from the evils of splitting infinitives to historical reminiscences to balancing his checkbook to Godot-like repetitions of pet phrases.

McMurtry does some of his finest work in some time as the judge. Biddle is deteriorating in body and mind; each has disturbing lapses from coherence. McMurtry shows how that feels.

Sarah's task with the judge resembles flying a kite without a tail. The character creates a similar problem since Sarah, as

written, is as tip of the iceberg as Biddle. We know so little about her (at one point we learn she's having marital difficulties but Biddle, who must have the last word, stifles more information). The actor playing Sarah would be tempted to make extra-vivid any shard of behavior or revelation. To her credit — and to director Richard Seer's expert stress on understatement and nuance -Christine Marie Brown exercises restraint. She admirably takes just what each moment gives and builds Sarah from way within.

Trying, it turns out, is a memory play about memory loss. In 1967 the playwright — "a green young girl from the Canadian prairie" — went to work for Francis Biddle in his Georgetown office (a room above his two-car garage replicated in detail by Alan E. Muraoka at the Carter). "Occasionally he drove me to tears," she writes, "but I knew I was witnessing a man of great intelligence doing battle, fiercely, with his mortality."

The best part of Lamb's current offering, Rehearsal for Murder, happens before the stilted dialogue begins. Robert Smyth, as a playwright convinced his fiancée was murdered a year ago to the day, sets the stage for a reading of his new mystery. Smyth pushes buttons on a remote lightboard, and the empty stage glooms, dapples, or brightens with theatrical magic. And throughout, Nick Parde's expert lighting rinses the space in various moods, including wispy effects for scenes set in the past.

Great stuff. But as Hamlet says, the play's the thing, and D.D. Brookes's mystery-psychodrama, even with a talented Lamb's cast, lacks interesting characters (each is a type playing a type: the parsimonious producer, the vain romantic lead) and, the unkindest cuts of all, is short on intrigue and suspense.

Rehearsal's about a play within the play to catch the conscience of the culprit. In effect, it's a sting. But it takes all of a long, languidly paced first act to establish a "dunit" — the fiancé didn't "drop" 12 stories by herself; she was nudged — and a long, languidly paced second act to show that the "who" that dunit isn't who you think.

Lamb's bare-stage, blackwalled look suggests the epic

The Constant Wife

W. Somerset Maugham's 1926 comedy turns the tables on the Victorian "double standard," in which two-faced males philander while their wives remain models of subservient rectitude. Constance, whose husband John is having an affair, says that if a woman's finan cially dependent on her husband, then he's "bought her fidelity." But what if — and the idea dawns on Constance like an electric light in a gaslit world - what if the woman became economically independent? The Old Globe has tamed Maugham's "drama of conversation" somewhat. And a lengthy sag in the long first act begs for a trim as well. The payoffs are worth the

trek, however, especially watching John squirm when hoisted by his own, um, petard. Ralph Funicello's all-white drawing room, in which Lewis Brown's London fashions flower like a spring bouquet, is a model of formality. Not all the performances reach beyond the decor, and the cast isn't unified stylistically: some do comedy of manners (or mannerisms); others suggest dimensions beyond the script - in particular, Henny Russell's Constance, who is more the playwright's spokesperson than a complex character. Russell keeps her center cool, no mean feat since it pares away swaths of actorial choices (but pushes her toward a cold, unappealing rationality). J Paul Boehmer rightly plays

Bernard as a living Arrow shirt ad, and mustachioed Wynn Harmon, a dead ringer for Edgar Allen Poe, does a fine comic turn as John, waxing most eloquent when the good doctor becomes speechless. Worth a try.



Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terrible Turks mangled defrocked priests, while mums and dads yelled insults and grannies waved their handbags"). National Comedy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic director Garv Kramer savs the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a challenge match against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledge failure, abundantly, then forget it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian.

Worth a try.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but the "game show" on Fridays - is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" — two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and

"Gorilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, wrote one of the very best books I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art."

Worth a try.

Caffeinated Comedy Hugh Butternutt's done his lounge act at the Triple Espresso Coffeehouse 20 years to the day. While patrons sip a house blend — "Grape," "Scandinavian Blizzard," or "Mokoko Cocoa Mocha" — Hugh plays '70s tunes on the piano. He and his companions, here to celebrate Hugh's anniversary, got stuck in the '70s. The trio used to be Maxwell, Butternutt, and Bean, a comedy group that never went far. They're "losers," they admit, but not "ordinary" ones. And, hey, their reunion could help them face searing issues from their mediocre pasts. A formulaic story line? Yep. Straight from Forever Plaid. There's also the Forever Plaid problem: the three comedians are far too talented to play inept characters. One's a whiz at the piano. Another's a first-rate mime, and the third's a crackerjack magician. The trio is so talented, when the plot has them complain of difficulties to overcome, you wish they'd quit trumping up the pseudo-drama and get on with this highly entertaining, if lightweight show. (Note: the original cast members have been replaced.)

Worth a try.

'They were playing too loud, and it's a small club," says Aldred (who opened the Cardiff venue in May 1976). "Sometimes they listen, sometimes they don't." He confirms that the

When Dolls Don't

Charm The Dresden Dolls opened for Nine Inch Nails at Soma last May. Two years ago, the Dresden Dolls coheadlined a New Year's Eve show at 4th & B. Some people say the band shouldn't have played their sold-out April 18 show at Mira Mesa's Epicentre.

"I couldn't see the singer," says a fan. "I could see the drummer because he was on a riser. But because the stage was so low, only the first two rows could see the singer. But you can't raise the stage





because of that big crossbeam over the stage. Even if they had a higher stage, the singer would be looking at that cross-beam because it hangs too low."

A Dresden Dolls tour staffer concedes that the allage venue is not meant for national acts.

"It's a flat-out strange room," says the tour insider. "This [ten-date] tour was booked strictly with smaller, under-age venues in mind.... I don't think I really love [the Epicentre]. But we will continue to bring younger, developing bands there.'

As to whether the venue

attracted a young audience that night, the unhappy fan says one-fourth of the crowd at the show was under 21 and "one-quarter of the people were normal-looking people over 35. Pack Up the Blue Suede Shoes A couple years ago, New York


billionaire Bob Sillerman paid \$114 million for an 85 percent stake in Elvis Presley Enterprises. Recently, in advance of a planned Elvis Presley Las Vegas cabaret act, Sillerman is putting all the King's lookalikes on notice.

"If we were going to do a show that was based on Elvis impersonators, then obviously it wouldn't make sense to have unauthorized Elvis impersonators," he told the New York Times.

Sillerman wants to charge faux Elvi 25 percent of the performer's fee, and that's if he allows anyone to wear the jumpsuit and sideburns at all (he's undecided). Around a half-dozen local impersonators would be affected.

"It's crazy. You can't claim a public icon as your own," says Skip Banks, whose comedic Elvis act earns him \$300 to \$2400 per performance. Asked how much he'd be willing to pay in licensing fees, Banks (who did his Elvis shtick on George Lopez's TV show) says, "I'll give them five extra squares of toilet paper."

Steven Gabriel, who impersonates "the skinny Elvis," says, "[Sillerman] should be paying us.... We're like the promotion and marketing guys at a record company, spreading awareness and keeping a performer's name out there. [Elvis] impersonators kept the fire going all these years; we're the reason the rights are



worth hundreds of millions of dollars.... We're walking, hipwiggling billboards for his baby, and he should reward us, not put us out of business.

Muscle to Back the Rap Muay Thai boxer Charles Williams isn't the only pro athlete to try to make it in hip-hop.

"Roy Jones Jr. was a great boxer who came out with an album," says Williams. "It wasn't that good [Deion Sanders] also came out with

an album. But he should stick to what he does best. They try to rap just because they can."

Billed as Joint Response, Williams and partner DJ Shag have performed at Brick by Brick, Tio Leo's, and Buster Daly's. The duo has released a 16-song CD and a three-song 12-inch disc.

"It's on colored vinyl," says Williams. "It's orange with red streaks. When you have live shows, it's good to have wax.... Financially, I wasn't able to get a lot of copies made," so Joint Response is out of CDs and records. Williams, who lives in Santee, was raised in

Southeast San Diego. "I have been training since I was 13. I got into [martial arts] because of

Bruce Lee movies." Does the kickboxing ever hinder his music-

making? "Only if I get beat up real bad and have to do a show the next day.... The worst I had

was a black eye and bruises. I've seen people get knocked out where they had to be carried out on stretchers. I saw guys going into seizures." He says muay Thai is an art form, unlike ultimate

fighting, "...where anything goes.... A lot of people just call [muay Thai] kickboxing. You use your shins, knees, elbows, and hands." His last paid fight was April 1 in Denver. "That was my K-1 debut. The K-1 organization is the highest level of muay Thai."

Williams, born in 1974 (the same year "Kung Fu Fighting" was a number-one hit), says he hasn't written any kickboxing tunes. "I'd like to connect the two, but I don't want it to be corny. I



I listened to Andrea Echeverri's eponymous debut CD for a solid month before I learned what it was about. Having minimal Spanishspeaking skills. I had no clear idea what she was singing. Based on the music alone, her disc spent a long time in my CD changer. Echeverri rides a folksy undercurrent with persistent melodies on a sexy groove, intimate, something like post-coital pillow talk. There is a fine blend of club layering and of the earthy folkloric rhythms indigenous to her native Colombian culture. No one has balanced the traditional with pop music nearly so well, I think, since Los Lobos. But it took a translation to point out that half of the songs on the CD are about giving birth to her daughter ("Lactochampeta" - it's about breast feeding) or songs from the bed she shares with her husband, a historian named Manolo Jaramillo.

What did I expect? Airheaded "dear diary" stuff about girl meets boy, I suppose, suspended in a gelatinous ooze of drum beats and song hooks delivered by a hoochie wrapped in spandex with much cleavage, big hair, and a big rump to match. Conclusions based on the current spate of Latina pop superstars.

As far as image goes, Echeverri is a 39-year-old hippie from Colombia. She

made her name as one-half of the Latin Grammy Award-winning, punk-infused trip-hop duo Aterciopelados. In that setting, her look is somewhat androgynous, and her voice is one of angry defiance. She is a rocker. She's been called rebellious, and Aterciopelados (translation: the velvety ones) has a large international following. Otherwise, her solo work couldn't be more different. Motherhood

has taken the hard edge off of her world view. Solo, Echeverri is the refined earth mother. Envision the poetics of Sandra Cisneros combined with Sheryl Crow's killer instinct for melody in Ani DiFranco's skin.

Diving for Pearls

Red Pearl Kitchen made a splash in Huntington Beach. Now it's testing the waters of San Diego, and if the nearly full houses are any indication, it's getting on swimmingly.

Enter the restaurant from the mezzanine and you can look down on the action. Half of the dining room's walls are brick with horizontal racing stripes in shiny metallic glaze; the other half are drywalled and painted bright red; the floor is made of glittery dark pebbles set in poured epoxy. The open ceiling is painted black, pipes and ducts fashionably on display, hung with large red Japanese-style lampshades. Smaller pendant table lamps are made from amber plastic slats held together at odd angles by red plastic "chopsticks," like a sophisticated arts 'n' crafts project. Most seating is at black leather banquettes or booths for two. From the mezzanine, the hostess leads you down a ramp, past a comfortable-looking bar-lounge with straw chairs. A stone Buddha presides over the diners with a faint, benign smile, unbothered by a noise level so high that, if there's a large party seated anywhere in the room, you'll have to yell at your servers and tablemates.

The long menu is an anthology of Asian "pick hits," reinterpreted by a young American chef, Jason Marcus. His menu differs from that of the Huntington Beach flagship, where the chef is Vietnamese. Marcus culled his dishes from favorites he's enjoyed at Asian restaurants in the U.S. and during a three-month eating tour along the Mekong River (Vietnam, Cambodia, south-it's Asian-flavored food.

The menu is heaviest on starters, with 21 choices. With the exception of 11 "dim sum" and six desserts, dishes are grouped in sets of five. Our company found the entrées better than the starters.

The "dim sum" list includes Chinese, Vietnamese, and Japanese-style nibbles. Scallop-Bacon Beggar's Purses offer delicate flour wrappers, flecked with black sesame seeds, containing a moist Cantonese-style forcemeat of pork ground with bacon, scallions, light soy, and ginger and amended by non-Cantonese mint, orange zest, and shiro dashi (Japanese bonito broth). Each purse supposedly contains one small bay scallop, but in two orders on two visits, we found them in only two of ten purses. The chef

later explained that the scallops tend to "melt" into the filling. (Maybe he could use two little scallops instead of one? Or perhaps the sous-chefs don't always put in a scallop?) The dumplings come with a light lemongrass-sesame oil dip. Eat them while they're hot; once cool,

the filling loses its attractive liquidity. In the Dungeness Crab-Pork

Spring Roll, we found more pork

forcemeat (with stronger seasonings, including mint and Thai basil, inspired by the cuisine of Vietnam rather than China). The crab puréed into the filling isn't discernible, beyond adding a whisper of a seafood flavoring. The filling's foamrubber texture reminded me of ill-made versions of Vietnamese minced shrimp on sugar cane. Coconut Katsu Chicken Tenders are fingers cut from the breast, dredged in panko with a few coconut shreds and fried whole, then sliced; some of the pieces are half naked. These come with a sauce of crushed pineapple with sambal (Indonesian chili paste) - hot chili, fish sauce, and red onion. The pineapple tastes anemic, but it's the best anybody can hope for at this time of year.

Next on the menu are five salads. The Shredded Duck Lettuce Wraps shouldn't be missed. The lettuce is velvety butterhead, easier to roll than iceberg. The filling consists of crisp duck and shiitake shreds with minced scallions in a

thin, slightly sweet, slightly spicy sauce, enlivened by more sambal and a touch of ketchup. The condiments include a mini-salad of oval cherry tomatoes, chopped

cucumbers, and red onions - and (ta-da!) a luscious banana purée with cinnamon and spicy sambal. The purée has the soft, moist texture of baba ganoush, a perfect complement to the crackly duck. On the other hand, a pretty-looking molded cone of Thai Green Papaya Salad with rock shrimp was devoid of flavor. Even the papaya shreds tasted tired and neutral rather than crisp and pleasantly sour, and the dressing lacked zest — or hot chili heat. This dish was an omen: We later encountered others that were bland compared to their "ethnic" versions, compromised by the attempt to please all palates.

A section called "Grill" offers more small dishes and finger foods. The most spectacular

choice is the Strawberry-Cinnamon Ribs - falloff-the-bone braised spare ribs crisped on the grill and slathered with a thick, sweet sauce redolent of cinnamon and star anise. It's a dish that the chef first ate in Ho Chi Minh City; it's changed a bit in his version. The gravy is made from cooked-down strawberries, touched with honey, miso, and Asian red vinegar; the fruit is transformed beyond recognition, resembling a gentled-down hoisin sauce. Sorry, no witticisms from the posse — we couldn't hear each other over the din — but we did give four thumbs up





for this dish. On the other hand, while the Pineapple Kobe Beef Satay was tender, with its Snake River (Idaho) Kobe flap-steak, we were underwhelmed by the indistinct marinade and topping of pallid pineapple and minced peanuts.

The Hot Pot selections include the best dish we tasted: Red Curry Short Ribs with Pumpkin. A handsome iron pot with a wooden lid contains tender short-rib meat, stripped off the bone, and chunks of soft pumpkin and banana in a pond of thick coconut-cream curry seasoned with nutmeg and enriched with pumpkin purée. This luxuriously unique combination of flavors bespeaks its Cambodian origins, but the recipe is the chef's invention. Get it while it's hot it's going off-menu soon because pumpkin season is over.

Another night, we tried the Hot & Sour Jungle Shellfish Curry hot pot. It's a tasty dish, but the only true word in the title is "&." It's not hot — the spice level is a two at most. It's only slightly sour from a shy touch of tamarind, and it's nothing like the spinach-laden (and incendiary) Thai dishes called "jungle curry" - here, a few shreds of gai lan (Chinese broccoli greens) represent an entire rain forest. As for shellfish — yes, there are mussels and clams, but even more salmon cubes and calamari rings. (The squid's cartilage beak and "backbone" do not an exoskeleton make.) With the truth-in-labeling issues out of the way, what do we have? A light seafood soup that tastes more Japanese than jungle worth ordering if you know what not to expect.

The only dish we tried from the Noodle & Rice section was Mee Goreng, Indonesian-style pan-fried noodles, here mixed with sweet Chinese *lap chong* sausage and balls of pork forcemeat (like that in the Beggars' Purses), plus the usual odds and ends. The noodles are dressed with a slightly greasy, faintly sweet curry sauce. We found the combination depressing. After this and the papaya salad, I didn't have the stomach to try the chef's Pad Thai. However, another untried dish made my list for next time: Udon noodles with pork belly (unsmoked bacon, much prized in China) and fried egg in a smoky miso sauce sounds like a bowlful of adventure.

Wok-Fired dishes are next on the list. Here, the pick hit is Five-Spice Braised Pork and Lychees, made with longbraised, tender chunks of Kurubota pork (the pig equivalent of Kobe beef) from the cheek — a cut that stews up moist and rich. It pairs off with a delicate sauce dotted with canned lychees, an aggressively sweet-sharp Asian fruit with a mustardlike undertone. Rounding out the flavors are gai lan greens, scallions, chopped water chestnuts, and black sesame seeds. The effect is light and savorysweet

Chili Garlic Shrimp proved vibrant, if salty: Soaked in salt water to soften the shells, the shrimp are wokked unpeeled. The shells, all but the tail pieces, melt away in the heat, leaving a smoky maritime flavor on the plump and tender prawns. (If you want to try this at home, kids, you'll need verv fresh, never-frozen thinshelled shrimp, such as Thai tiger prawns.) The dish is finished with a sweet-hot-garlicky sauce and garnishes of chopped long beans and baby corn on the cob.

I found Shaking Kobe Beef less satisfactory, a walk on the mild side compared to the lively versions you can find at good Vietnamese restaurants (e.g., Le Bambou in Del Mar, not to mention the definitive rendition at Slanted Door in San Francisco). Kobe or no, the beef slices are chewy, with sinewy bits. They mingle with

diced red papaya, tomato, red onions, and white sesame but the sauce is nondescript, lacking the assertive black pepper and caramelized sugar flavors that are the raisons d'être of this dish. Another evening's wok dish of Ginger-Scallion Scallops and Snow Peas proved a standard combination. Flaccid dry-pack Maine scallops were garnished with stemmy, near-leafless pea shoots, along with stringy pods picked past their prime. (All veggies here come from two large purveyors based in L.A.) The mild, thin sauce tasted as if it might be based on vegetable broth rather than the hearty chicken stock of Cantonese restaurants.

Vegetable side dishes are worth every penny of their modest price. I don't know what the Chinese province of Yunnan (famed for its hams) contributed to Chili-Roasted Yunnan Yams - but the crispsoft cubes dusted with spice powder and touched with garlic yogurt are irresistible. Garlic Chinese eggplant slices are soft but crackly and caramelized at the edges, robed in an oily Szechwan-style sauce dotted with hot pepper seeds. Oddly, the spicing recedes after the first bite. Although the menu includes only one vegetarian dish each among the dim sum, salads, and main courses (a tofu hot pot), the generously sized sides - which also include Asian greens, dry-sautéed long beans, and roasted edamame — amply fill the gap.

The staff is large and well trained. Servers seem enthusiastic, bussers circulate to whisk away dishes as soon as you're done, and a charming floor manager makes regular rounds to ensure that everyone's taken care of. There's even a helpful *sommelier* who can help you navigate the unconventional wine choices.

Desserts, called "Happy Ending," are provided by the corporation, but they're charming, too. The lightest is a pear poached in sake with a scoop of zingy ginger ice cream and a fig-nut cookie. The menu says it comes with pomegranate, but it arrived with sliced kiwis instead. We forgave it — although pomegranate would be more interesting. Passion Fruit Andagi are fresh-made, airy donut puffs (resembling Hawaiian malasada) set atop a tangy passionfruit cream sauce with a scoop of superb coconut ice cream served alongside. Cardamom custard is rich, more pot de crème than panna cotta. It tastes exotic with chopped lychees on the side and a plum wine glaze on the plate. Banana cake is light and homey, plated over jasmine caramel (be sure to inhale its spicy-floral aroma) and comes with chai-spiced ice cream. Chocoholics will also find a chocolate soufflé with Mandarin ice cream, which we didn't try. Or you can just go for ice cream (from Gelato Paradiso) in any of these inventive flavors as well as the conventional chocolate and vanilla. Even if Asians don't eat dessert, Americans do and should be pleased with this assortment. You may have to pick your way through the menu to enjoy Red Pearl's most lustrous gems, but the sweets are all good.

ABOUT THE CHEF

"Cooking was a hobby that grew into my profession," says Jason Marcus, aged 26. He grew up in New Jersey in a family of passionate gourmands. Everyone loved to cook, but the family also ate out frequently at New York's ethnic and "fine food" restaurants. "Food is an integral part of my upbringing," he says. "By the end of high school, it was important to me to do something that had some civic responsibility. Cooking was always something that made people happy."

He majored in philosophy and leadership studies at University of Richmond (Virginia). "When I was in school, I did a little professional cooking — I'd do some catering for professors' parties," he says. He toured Europe during junior year, before a semester at Oxford and subsequent internships in law, finance, and political science. "It was always assumed I was going to go into law or something like that, but when I graduated school [in 2001], I told my parents I wanted to take some months to give cooking a shot. It was always something knocking at my tongue. No one thought I was going to do it until I did it. I don't know what it was like 20 years ago to be a chef, but right now - intellectually, artistically, philosophically — one can really pursue this profession as far as one wants.'

With no formal training, he found an apprenticeship at Sunset Beach restaurant in Shelter Island, New York City, where he learned the basics before working under the renowned Bill Telepan at Judson Grill. In 2002, he took off for three months to travel along the Mekong River, visiting Vietnam, Cambodia, and southern Thailand. "Every day I was learning. I was discovering something new, eating delightful food. Vietnam is one of my homes away from home.

He went on to cook under chef David Kinch at the acclaimed Manresa Restaurant in Los Gatos (near Santa Cruz). "It was the most amazing restaurant I'd been to, ever. David was intrigued with new techniques, with avant-garde flavor combinations. But most of the chefs there were trained in classical French techniques as well. It was really a great experience for me, but it's in a small town, and there wasn't enough for the other side of my life there." He moved to New York City to work at Punch and Judy, where he sought to create original dishes. "My idea was, don't do anything anyone else is doing. The owners were looking for someone with a lot of energy and passion and let me do pretty much whatever I felt like doing. It really was a dream."

Returning to California as chef de cuisine at Los Angeles's Meson G, he was offered the position of executive chef at Red Pearl Kitchen. Before the new restaurant opened, he spent a month observing at the Huntington Beach flagship, but for the San Diego location, he was given largely free rein to create his own Asian menu. "I didn't know much about San Diego before I came here. I wouldn't have done it if it was in a big city like Los Angeles or New York, but I knew there would be nothing like it here, nothing like the menu that we were putting together. I was excited about coming to a town that would appreciate us being here. I felt like I could really make a difference.

"It's fun — it's fun and at the same time it's difficult to learn about all these ingredients and how they work together. I take some sort of pride in recreating dishes that do exist somewhere else in the world, even if they're not quite the same...I love Asian food, and I want people to fall in love with what I fell in love with. It's like feel-good cuisine to me. I would love if these dishes became part of the pantheon of comforting, familiar food. It's got to become a part of you. As long as these dishes are still considered exotic, different, not normal, it's hard for the food community to really grow...In this country, we need to learn a little more about eating. I think it's important for the food community as chefs, for the food community as diners, for us, in general, as people who eat." ■







Same Latitude

"You must enjoy your life while you can. That was his philosophy."

hmygod, it's Omar...again!" This is me, standing under a big poster on the wall here at Darband's. "Which Omar would that be?" says Hank. "Who else, bro? Omar Khayyam."

"Oh Lord. 'The bird of time...short distance to fly...' I should've guessed."

This is a Persian place, after all. Hank likes 'em 'cause of their fresh everything, salad-wise, and firecooked meats, easy on the oils.

We look up at the poster. There's the great old wine-loving mystic and mathematician with his words floating out and women dancing to them below.

Of course, the words're in Persian script. Big, flowy, backwards.

"Uh, what does it say?" I ask Tony, the owner. "It says, 'Everything passes.' You must enjoy

your life while you can. That was his philosophy. I followed Hank in here 'cause he needs to eat before taking his little old mom to choir practice. We parked beside this maroon awning and strode into a patio with climbing vines growing up the sides and flowers hanging along the front.

A group of men stood around one of the outside tables, throwing dice into a box. Huh. Backgammon. They make the place feel genuine. Inside, it seemed to be all men too, sitting 'round the dozen tables. On the left wall they have a grocery section, shelves filled with rice and spices for sale.



The high counter and kitchen are at the end. That's where, for the second time in a month, we find ourselves staring at our old friend Omar Khayyam.

Tony hands us menus. We sit down with them. Only now do we notice the four-foot-wide plasma TV, the pretty pictures of places like Persepolis

and Esfahan, ancient capitals of Persia, on the walls.

"Quick," Hank says. "I can't be late.

I look hard at the menu. Yes, the words are foreign — "Koobideh Kabob," and "Shirazi," and "Baghali Polo," but when I think about it, the foods aren't that different, even though

they seem exotic. "Koobideh Kabob" is ground sirloin cooked on a skewer, with salad and rice. "Shirazi" is chopped cucumbers, tomatoes, onions, and parsley in olive oil and lemon juice. From Shiraz, the Poets' Capital, one Iranian friend told me. Also a famous grape, right? And "Baghali Polo" is... baked chicken. With different sauces, and not cooked like the Colonel's, for sure, but what can be strange about baked chicken? And hey, look at the atlas. They're on the same lat-

itude as us. "Now," orders Hank, when the guy comes.

"You first," I say.

He looks up at the waiter. "Number 13."

I race to see what it is. "Khoresh Bademjan." Baby eggplant stew. "Sautéed baby eggplant, beef, homemade tomato sauce, and special seasoning served with basmati rice, \$9.95."

It's the daily special for today, which is Thursday. I love eggplant.

"Oh, I'm low. Can't pay for you," Hank says, without looking up.

Jeez. This was his idea. Good thing I didn't blurt out some expensive dish like Number 22, "Barg," marinated beef tenderloin with rice and charbroiled tomato, \$13.95. Even the vegetarian plate is \$8.95 (though a veggie wrap's \$5.95).

So now I'm looking at salads (around six or seven bucks) and kabobs (the menu "highly recommends" number 40, the "Chicken Shish Kabob, \$7.45," which is boneless chicken with grilled onions, green peppers, tomato, and sauce in lavash bread).

But wait: they also have these "mini plates." Mini chicken kabob with a skewer of chicken, salad and rice (\$7.95), or the same, but with ground sirloin ("Mini Koobideh, \$6.95"), or chunks of filet mignon ("Mini Shish Kabob, \$7.95").

'Now," says Hank. "Or never.'

"Okay, okay. Koobideh kabob," I tell the waiter. I can get through ground sirloin quicker than chewy chunks of meat, and Hank's gonna be gone, in about five flat.

But the "mini" tag worries me. How mini? Hey hey! Our plates are both, like, bi-i-ig.

Hank's eggplant stew comes in an oval dish set on a larger plate with a big salad, with another little pot of *shirazi* salad.

My "mini" koobideh is a beautiful-looking plate

on top, a salad at one end, pita bread, lemon, a long de-skewered kabob of ground beef, and a grilled Anaheim pepper that's just as big as the kabob. What a seven-buck deal, and not in polystyrene boxes as I expected. Really, these dishes look as good as anything you'll find in the Gaslamp. My beef's marinated, and the giant chili gives

of basmati rice with saffron-colored rice sprinkled

a modest amount of heat. And when we do some exchange, Hank's stew goes down tangy and warm, as if the beef and eggplant have had plenty of time to get acquainted. Slow-cooked, I'm guessing. Great with the rice. The salad has chunks of mango in it, too. Cool.

Õh Lord. They have desserts like rosewater ice cream and saffron rice pudding and passion fruit mousse. But Hank's already heading for the counter to pay his part of the bill.

"What does 'Darband' mean?" I ask Tony he's Iranian — while I fork over my Jefferson. (I also got a bottle of Perrier, \$1.50 - I know, but it's about the cheapest drink here.)

"Darband is a beautiful valley, a resort in the mountains north of Tehran," he says.

Has he been back?

"Not for 20 years." "That's too bad."


"Don't worry," says Tony. "I will." He looks up at old Omar Khayyam's words. "Everything passes." ■

Not Bad, Just Not Thrilling

"We want you to walk away with the notion that it's worthy of careful consideration."

s of 2005, Pinot Noir is now outselling Zinfandel in California. This is nothing short of remarkable, a testament to the tremendous power of cinema. Zinfandel has a long history in this state; its reputation was made here, instead of in Europe. Producers have risen

to prominence because of their success with the grape: Turley, Ridge, Ravenswood, and Rosenblum, to name only a few. It may not have been born here, but it's "our" grape. It has, in Zinfandel Advocates and Producers, a wellorganized promotional body

behind it. Every year, there is an enormous ZAP gathering in San Francisco, and after that, a touring version of the festival.

Pinot Noir has only Sideways.

Pinot Noir — temperamental, fragile, thinskinned — was the favorite grape of (and analogue for) Miles, *Sideways*'middle-aged loser-hero. Somehow, Miles, a failed novelist who steals from his mother and drunk-dials his ex, managed to make Pinot a winner. He also did his best to make another grape a loser, and it wasn't Zinfandel. With one desperate (and rather blue) oath taken outside the Hitching Post restaurant, he also gave a rallying cry to a certain segment of the wine-drinking world: "I am not drinking any fucking Merlot!"



Why was Miles so hostile? Because Merlot, the party line goes, isn't "serious wine." The most common descriptor I've heard associated with it is "plush." "Plush" isn't bad, really; it's just not thrilling. Merlot, according to this characteriza-

tion, is pleasant. What it isn't is deep, powerful, complex, elegant, intense, or structured. It's comfortable, simple, easy.

Perhaps in some measure because of this, it is the most popular red wine in the U.S., outselling Cabernet by a little and everything else by a lot. Sure, it's nowhere

near Chardonnay — which seems to be weathering its own backlash (the "Anything But Chardonnay" campaign) nicely, thank you. But it's big enough to allow for that special disdain reserved for the hulking behemoth in any industry.

"Sideways actually helped to bring up a pressing issue about Merlot," says Stu Harrison, general manager at Swanson Vineyards, which devotes some 70 percent of its production to estate-grown Merlot. *"Seven months before the movie came out, the 14 people who work at Swanson got together to talk about various problems. One of our employees in the hospitality area — we call it the salon — said that people were coming in, sitting down, and saying, 'No, I don't drink Mer-* lot,' or 'I don't like Merlot.' "

This was distressing news. "We were saying, 'No, that's not right — Merlot is what we do; we're fanatical about it. We're getting lumped in with the vast ocean of Merlot out there. Let's do something about it."

Part of what they did about it involved hitting the road with a tasting seminar entitled "Merlot...The Untold Story." That seminar stopped by San Diego a few weeks back, setting up shop in the clubby confines of Donovan's steakhouse in the UTC area. Harrison, a veteran of Mumm and Opus One (among others), was joined by winemaker Chris Phelps, himself late of Dominus and Caymus.

The "untold story," says Harrison, is "the notion that Merlot is a pretty serious varietal. There is a special set of criteria which define what are really exceptional Merlots. We want you to walk away with the notion that it's a pretty specialized category and worthy of careful consideration...it's a noble variety, and in very specific growing conditions, with specific cellar treatment, it can produce a world-class wine."

Gosh, but that's a lot of specificity. A body might get the impression that Merlot was another Pinot Noir — a grape so temperamental that even its most famous producers, the Burgundians, have endless troubles with it. But Harrison says nay, and there's the rub. "I've actually heard, 'Oh, my gosh, Pinot Noir is getting so popular, it's going to be the next Merlot.' No, it will not become the next Merlot, because Pinot Noir is the worst workhorse varietal in the world. Pinot Noir grown in less-than-optimal conditions produces an insipid, light, almost rosé wine."

Merlot, on the other hand, "has the unusual trait" of serving as both noble varietal and workhorse — and a workhorse is what you need to become really popular on a grand scale. First,

"It's a bountiful producer." If you let it do its thing and don't thin your crop, you can get "10 to 12 tons of fruit per acre." Second, "In lessthan-optimal growing conditions — even in the hottest region of the San Joaquin Valley, it will still produce a red wine with color." Third, "With Merlot, you have less angular, less astringent tannins" than in many other red grapes. That means that, even without all those specialized growing conditions and cellar practices, "You can grow a wine that is soft and approachable for the entrylevel drinker." Harrison calls this confluence of easy growing and mass consumer interest "a perfect storm" that has created "a sea of interest." Not to mention a sea of product.

"It's this almost schizophrenic nature of Mer-







lot" — the noble grape that which has created the situation today." Today, Merlot sales are huge, but about half of it "wholesales for less than \$36 a case. You cannot make anything but a very ordinary Merlot for \$36 a case." And if the very ordinary Merlot is setting the standard, your specialty Merlot may be in trouble. (Cabernet seems to have dodged this particular bullet perhaps because it isn't quite as friendly at the entry level? Plush, plush, plush.) "In the wholesale \$13-\$20 bottle range, you saw phenomenal growth in the year 2000. Sales doubled. But it wasn't healthy for the market — everybody was jumping into Merlot." Sales plateaued in 2002 and dropped sharply in 2003. Bad news for Swanson and company.

"I was talking to a gentleman before the seminar," says Harrison, "and he agreed with almost every single point I made with regard to Merlot. One of his comments was, 'Boy, you guys are screwed.' But I disagree. I think that at the end of the day, quality will out. The reason we're doing this seminar is to offer people the notion, 'You've got to be very selective. You've got to look for certain things. There are people who are very serious about this category who should be taken seriously.'

What are those "certain things"? More next week. ■

Breakfasts, though, are spectacular, e.g., the airy, bittersweet tangerine souffle pancakes may just be the ideal way to jump-start the morning. Open daily, three meals. Expensive. — *N.W. (4/02)*

Beach Grass Cafe 159 South Coast Highway 101 (one block south of Loma Santa Fe), Solana Beach, 858-509-0632. Formerly a branch of Parkhouse Eatery, Beach Grass has been bought by a minichain (with Swami's Cafe and Honey's), but still serves the original recipes. You could eat breakfast here daily and never get bored with the creative morning menu, which includes foamy, fresh orange juice and "Beach Benedict" with eggs and house-made hollandaise on a soft, lush crab cake. Oddly, though, the "maple" syrup and "butter" spread are both mass-market blends. Lunches and dinners feature multiethnic "coastal cuisine," with the best results in seafood dishes like "Moroccan crabcakes" and the fish 'n' yam chips (with fine housemade tartar sauce). Vegetable accompaniments are tasty and creative. Reservations essential for weekend breakfasts. Free parking in back via driveway to right of restaurant. Breakfast through dinner daily. Moderate to slightly expensive. — *N.W. (6/05)*

Besta Wan Pizza House 148 Aberdeen Drive (off the 101), Cardiff-by-the-Sea, 760-753-6707. This ever-popular North County restaurant which opened back in 1965 is a family operation all the way. Their thin-crust East Coast-style pizzas are famous locally. Also check for the big-pile spaghetti or lasagna specials if you just want to fill up. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (1/01)*

Cafe Zinc 132 South Cedros (at Loma Santa Fe), Solana Beach, 858-793-5436. The Rancho Santa Fe set like to hang out here in the garden patio with their Porsches at the curb and their shih tzus under the table (dogs are welcome). Even for non-doggie people, the California pepper trees and garden sculpture make this indoor-outdoor eatery a really pleasant kick-back place (which gets its name from the zinc-top bar inside). The menu, a mixture of Italian and vegetarian, offers dishes like frittata with cucumber salsa, and baked eggplant "pizzette" (personal-size pizza) with marinara, mozzarella, and Parmesan cheese. The vegetarian chili and the Zinc veggie burger (served on a La Brea bun) are tasty too. Open seven days, breakfast through late lunch. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (9/01)*

En Familia Amici 564 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-753-9050. You'll feel like a guest at an intimate party eating a leisurely dinner in this small, noisy, pretty dining room. Chef Monica Szepesy and her brother Michael offer personalized, home-style renditions of South American cuisines, including house-made breads and beverages. Be sure to try the house's *chicha morada*, a tangy soft drink made from Peruvian purple corn. The fare includes numerous types of empanadas, tapas-like small plates, and full-size entrées — most from the family homeland, Peru. Desserts vary nightly and can include a cloud-like *tres leches* cake. Vegetarian and allergy-restricted diets accommodated. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Reservations necessary. Moderate. — *N.W. (5/04)*

La Especial Norte 604 North Coast Highway 101 (at Leucadia Boulevard), Leucadia, 760-942-1040. This big, brightly lit roadhouse sports highly whimsical decor (take a look at the blue ceramic "pond" in the dining room, complete with cayman) and boasts a five-page menu, including a page of a dozen regional soups and another full page for seafood. The soups are superb — the authentic Mexico City-style chicken soup is laden with avocados, chicken shreds, cilantro, and rice, and the savory eggplant soup includes airy little "croutons" of puffed relleno batter. The fresh, interesting seafood entrées outshine the relatively ordinary renditions of the standard stuffed-tortilla variations. No wheelchair access to rest rooms. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive. - N.W. (5/02)

Pacifica Del Mar Del Mar Plaza, 1555 Camino Del Mar (at 15th Street), Del Mar, 858-792-1803. The chic crowd is drawn here by Pacific Rim/ Californiafusion cuisine centering on seafood and organic, locally grown produce. It's qual-ity all the way, but some nights the restaurant is a victim of its own success. The riotous overflow crowds can chal-lenge the kitchen's capacities, not to mention diners' tender ears. (Best strategy for pleasure: Reserve for early or late on a weeknight, and ask for patio seat-ing or Room #2.) Fun list of low-priced mini-appetizers, plus great baked oys-ters, seared scallops, mustard catfish, and house-cured rib eye. The award-winning wine list is half price Thursday nights, and the full bar specializes in creative martinis. "Pacifica Dine-In" offers callin take-out for selected items. Lunch and dinner daily. Pacifica Breeze Café (a level down) offers savory dishes for breakfast through late lunch daily. Early-bird dinner discount. Expensive to very expensive. -N.W. (6/05)

Potato Shack Cafe 120 West I Street (off South Coast Highway 101), Encinitas, 760-436-1282. Check out the cute potato-toon mural on the side of the building — a sign for spud-lovers to load up on portions sized for lumberjacks from The Lumberyard across the street. American fries (served "All you can eat"), French fries, potato patties, and baked potatoes with various toppings are the heart of the menu, along with eggs, omelets, biscuits with sausage gravy, and beer-battered onion rings made from sweet reds. If size counts, consider the daunting inch-thick "manhole" pancake that's bigger than the plate. Lunch runs to "deli" sandwiches (with potatoes), or a hearty bowl of chili con carne. Arrive early weekends. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (10/01)

Ruby's Diner 1 Pierview Way, Oceanside, 760-433-7829. One thing about Ruby's: You can build an appetite just getting there. It's at the end of the 1/3 mile-long Oceanside pier. (There's a 50-cent electric wagon, too.) Ruby's is part of a themed "forties diner" chain stretching from LAX to Scottsdale, Arizona. But it's still fun. Shiny Chevy Corvette-style red leatherette and chrome booths, white walls, portholes, old Coca-Cola signs, "Dewey-Warren" presidential buttons, and that view to Hawaii. And pretty darned good-sized servings too; try their omelets. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/01)

Savory 267 N. El Camino Real, Encinitas, 760-634-5556. Chef-owner Pascal Vignau was executive chef of the Four Seasons Aviara when he decided he wanted his own little place. His casual strip-mall restaurant has been perpetually packed for dinner since opening day. Here he serves a monthly changing menu of Southern French and Mediterranean cooking spotlighting seasonal lo-cal produce. Highlights include an ultra-rich macaroni-and-ham casserole The adventurous mainly-Cal wine list is remarkably affordable, with many choices available by half-bottles and glasses (and modest corkage if you BYO). Dinner reservations urged; no groups larger than ten accommodated. High tea Saturday afternoon. Lunch Tuesday through Saturday; dinner Tues-day through Sunday. Moderate. — N.W. (12/03)

Tom Giblin's Irish Pub 640 Grand Avenue (at Roosevelt Street), Carlsbad Village, 760-729-7234. Occupying the whole of a handsome, sprawling, blocklong Elizabethan-style building, this friendly "small-townish" saloon offers ome above-average pub-grub, especially the perfect, moist corned beef with firmtender cabbage, the huge, lively salads and the house-baked brown bread. Boxty (Irish "peasant" potato pancakes, rarely found in California) are done up rather doughy rather than crisp to serve as "wraps" for corned beef and other dishes. Live music on holiday evenings and during happy hours. A large, attrac tive heated patio next to the parking lot offers some afternoon serenity. Open daily, lunch until late, plus Sunday

breakfast/brunch. Inexpensive. – N.W. (3/02)

Tony's Jacal 621 Valley Avenue (between Genevieve Street and Juanita Street), Eden Gardens, Solana Beach, 858-755-2274. Come here at night, when the mysterious low mud-brick arches with the stained glass windows make you think Old Mexico, when the Del Mar racing bar makes you think 1930s Hollywood, and the dining patio, under the 100-year-old chinaberry tree, looks straight out of Guadalaiara, Back in 1946. Tony Gonzales's wife Catalina started preparing food for fellow Mexican workers. Since then, everybody from Liz Taylor to J. Edgar Hoover has passed through these portals. Try the "La Colonia" combination of just about anything with rice and beans. Turkey meat is big here, and the (real) crab quesadilla in a corn tortilla is delicious too. Cheapest probably chicken strips with French fries. And "Jacal"? It means "shack." No lunch or dinner on Tuesday; no lunch Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/02)

Trattoria Positano (Cardiff-bythe-Sea) 2171 San Elijo Avenue (at Chesterfield), Cardiff-by-the-Sea, 760-632-0111. If you're tired of Italian restaurants, you'll be revitalized by this one. Original recipes, wonderful fresh fish, nightly specials, excellent lamb and pastas. Very warm atmosphere. A treasure. Reservations accepted only for parties of six or more; expect a wait at prime dinner hours, especially on weekends. Lunch and dinner six days, Sundays dinner only. Upper moderate. — *E.W. (6/98)*

NORTH INLAND

Abbey's Real Texas BBQ 6904 Miramar Road (at Commerce Street, behind Denny's), Miramar, 858-566-5235. Texas barbecue consists of meat, chicken, turkey, and links that are repeatedly mopped with a marinade and cooked in a big cast-iron smoker (rather than grilled over a fire). Here they use mesquite to barbecue the poultry quickly and the brisket ve-r-r-ry slowly. In addition to the usual BBQ sides (potato salad, coleslaw, beans, etc.), they offer a Caesar salad. At the Miramar branch the room is large and unadorned but very clean. Wheelchair accessible. Same menu lunch and dinner. Open daily; continuous service for lunch and early dinner

Mexican seafood, along with the usual dishes, is featured in a bright coffee-shop atmosphere with comfortable booths, big windows, a lunch counter and a salad bar. Shrimp and langostino ("squat lobster," in fishermen's terms) are the house specialties, and are well treated. Also consider an intense little marlin taco (squeeze some lime onto this rich, strong fish), or the savory *albondigas* soup (lime it up, too). Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive (standard dishes) to moderate (seafood). — *N.W. (6/01)*

Island Boy Grille 10066 Pacific Heights Boulevard (south of Mira Mesa Boulevard, at Carroll Canyon Road), Sorrento Mesa, 858-452-7708. It's the last thing you'd expect up here in Cor-porate Lunchland, but Pua Macario's Hawaiian food sanctuary is the real thing. Pua ("Flower") serves genuine items like purple *taro poi*, seven-hour cooked *lau-lau* (beef, pork, and fish slow-steamed in taro and banana leaves). rice delivered by the ice-cream scoop, potato salad delivered hot with shrimp and crab in it, and mahi mahi, lots of lovely flame-seared mahi mahi. Delivered in a standard polystyrene box, eat in or out. And heavy! The Wasa Plate will include, say, two big pieces of mahi mahi, a pile of shredded kalua pig and cabbage, or kahuna shrimp, or teriyaki chicken, plus two scoops of rice, salad and any side dish. If you're a really big kahuna, the Kanaka Plate will deliver three main entrées and three scoops of rice. Sparse decoration: eggshell blue walls with photos of real hula-dancing, and a longboard by Hawaiian Julian Cruz (it's yours for \$450). Warning: only open weekdays, from 10:30 a.m. to around 2:30 p.m. Always crowded. In-expensive. — *E.B.* (3/02)

Pho Hoa Hiep 9910 Mira Mesa Boule-vard, #A, 858-578-1468 (also at 6947 Linda Vista Road, 858-268-8406). This pho (soup) place of the brothers Hoa and Hiep is a clean, busy eatery near hi-tech offices. It's popular at lunch and dinner, partly because of frequent two-for-one deals. Try the #1, *Dac Biet Xe Lua*, an "extra large bowl" of soup filled with rare steak slices and well-done brisket, flank, tendon, and tripe along with mint and bean sprouts. A popular breakfast pho is "French bread with beef juicy cube soup." They also have rice dishes. And try the traditional fruit drinks, maybe the Xam Bo Luong, a combination of loganberry, black dates, seaweed, and lotus seeds in syrup. Lunch, dinner daily. In-expensive. — *E.B.* (5/03)


Rancho Valencia 5921 Valencia Circle, Rancho Santa Fe, 858-759-6216. Nestled in the lush garden setting of the Rancho Valencia Resort is one of San Diego's dining gems. They advertise the cuisine as California-French. Whatever. Every bite from appetizer to dessert is prepared and presented to delight Californians, French people — actually, any person on the planet with taste buds. Their crab cake topped with sun-dried apricot-mango chutney was equal to the best you'd eat around Chesapeake Bay. Also, enjoy an entrée of prime mesquitegrilled steak, fresh fish, veal, lamb, or chicken. Portions are generous, as is the wine list. Casual-elegant dress. Open daily, lunch and dinner; brunch Sunday. Very expensive. - S.M. (6/04)

Sand Crab Cafe 2229 Micro Place (at Opper, off Barham), Escondido, 760-480-2722. Sandy Crabbe (honest, that's his name) owns this fun, funky dive in the wilds of industrial Escondido near the San Marcos border. A visit offers the primordial, preschoolish joy of

whacking crabs to pieces with mallets and eating them with your hands. (Bibs are optional.) Everybody gets into the party spirit. There's a huge à la carte list of appetizers, soups, snacks, and main courses, often at bargain prices. Entrées include several crab-bucket combos cooked to a well-seasoned boil with corn, potatoes, and spicy Louisiana sausage. Most of the shellfish were flash-frozen on shipboard, but they're still tasty. The melted non-butter "spread" accompanying them appeals to the area's many health-conscious residents. (Or you can BYOButter and they'll melt it for you.) Fine tangy housemade key lime pie is a perfect finale. Beer and wine and good margaritas. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Tong Szechuan 609 North Broadway #E-F, Stater Brother's Shopping Center, Escondido, 760-480-9438. The "New Style Favorites" of North County Chi-nese restaurants feature fresh fruits. Tong's has several variants, mainly cornstarch-battered fried proteins in honey based sweet-and-sour sauce, lightened with loads of seasonal fruit chunks pineapple, papaya, pear, etc. They're tasty dishes. For the rest, the Szechuan specialties (hot-and-sour soup, kung pao ma la, etc.) are better than the old "Chinese-American" standards on the menu. Lunches are big, bargain-priced, and popular. In this quiet, pretty room, you may overhear northern or western Chinese dialects at nearby tables. Open daily lunch and dinner. Very inexpensive (lunch) to low-moderate. N.W. (5/01)

Vincent's Sirino's 113 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-745-3835. French-born chef-owner Vincent Grumel serves Gallic classics in an intimate, small-town bistro setting. This is a cuisine of rich dark sauces robing fine ingredients, such as a huge, flavorful veal chop (no factory calf, that). Mushrooms and vegetables (from local farmers or Grumel's own garden) are the season's best and sensitively treated. Desserts are worth every calorie — save room for the spectacular Bavarian. Full bar, fine wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Expensive. — N.W. (6/01)

Reservations are a necessity at this tiny trattoria, especially if you'd prefer the relative quiet of the roofed sidewalk patio to the din of the cute but cramped dining room. Don't look for meatballs and red sauce except at lunch because dinner is Tuscan-style, showcasing pastas with simple, fresh sauces. Highlights include chef-owner Mary Ann Vitale's housemade Sicilian-style fennel sausage, and if the feather-light potato gnocchi are a special, just say yes. Save room for a slice of house-made layer cake. Moderate. -N.W. (11/00)

The Pannikin Cafe 7467 Girard Avenue (at Pearl), La Jolla, 858-454-5453. Oh sure, the inside of this converted bungalow is cool, with its woody-green tables of different heights and cool damsels with animal temp-tattoos on their arms serving you. But here at Pannikin's La Jolla outpost, the outside's the "in" spot, with its brick and earth tones and weathered timber and sixties rain bow tables. But you have to make it through the laptop-clacking, cell phone-blabbing crowd who use this as their garden office and Very Important Meeting spot. Musicians, grad students, and school kids also show up to munch twigs and nuts and think serious thoughts. Breakfasts are mostly steamed-egg variations, including the popular Greek eggs and a filling breakfast burrito. For lunch, a mild chicken curry is a nutty treat, and "pannwiches" such as ham or tuna are fresh, generous, and worthy, though the retros among us will be looking for a salt lick all the way home. Don't overlook the Thai coconut soup, Atlantic salmon, and duck confit at dinner, or the niçoise salad at lunch. Beautiful interior; lovely heated patio; excellent service. Be sure to reserve, especially for dinner, to avoid a very long wait. Open daily. Moderate (tapas) to expensive. — *E.W.* (12/99)

Sadaf 613 Pearl Street (at Cuvier), La Jolla, 858-551-0643. You worry—those formal fixtures and black-tux waiters, the gold-encrusted paintings, and the crisp, pink table linens all scream "expensive!" Actually, prices are easygoing, especially at lunch. The appetizers are free: a basket of *lavash* (unleavened bread), and beside it, butter and a large sliced raw onion. Eating bread with onion makes you hungry, say the Per-sians. Then try skewers of chicken or ground filet mignon with rice or salad or albalou polo (rice, dried cherries, and chicken). Pistachio-and-rosewater ice cream is a great finale. Nonspecials and evening meals cost more, but at any price this is real Persian food, with typical ri-otous herbage and sybaritic spicing. Another branch in the Gaslamp turns into a nightclub after dinner, but the food's better at this La Jolla flagship. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (10/00)

Tutto Mare 4365 Executive Drive (at Executive Way), Golden Triangle, 858-597-1188. The modern Italian cuisine here emphasizes pasta and fresh seafood from the mesquite grill or oak-fired oven. Lunch hours roar with chic crowds from the surrounding office buildings, but the kitchen is most on its

toes then, too. Pastas are mainly house made, with fresh-tasting sauces, and substantial seafood salads are available. En trées (whether seafood or meat) may be overcooked by the fierce wood fires, and most come with minor variations of the same lemon-butter sauce and a one-sizefits-all veggie medley. Full bar, interesting wine list, good Happy Hour nibbles. Complimentary valet parking. Call for careful directions (very hard to find). Extremely noisy. Lunch and dinner week days, dinner weekends, Pastas and salads moderate, entrées expensive. N.W. (10/02)

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Andres' Patio Restaurant 1235 Morena Boulevard, Bay Park, 619-275-4114. This is a cozy cultural surprise on hard-to-define Morena Boule-vard. The food is flavorful (and not spicy-hot like Mexican and South American dishes). A good introduction to it is ropa vieja ("old clothes"): shredded beef sautéed with mushrooms, green pepper, and tomatoes with ever-present rice and black beans. And the Cuban sandwich (roast pork, baked ham, and cheese) shows off the Cuban handling of pork. Other interesting dishes include alcapuria (pork and green plantain) and luscious, messy *yuca con mojo* (yuca root with garlic oil). Open for lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (8/01)

Bale French Sandwich Shop 4879 University Avenue (at 49th Street), City Heights, 619-283-4352. Ann Nguyen started this back in 1980, and her prices haven't changed — they're incredibly low. But the taste of her sandwiches is up there in French-Vietnamese heaven. The Vietnamese are special at this: they do French better than the French — with some spicy Asian touches. The BBQ Pork French sandwich delivers the immediate taste of cilantro, garlicky mayonnaise, sweet barbecue sauce, carrots onions, cucumber, and lashings of sliced pork, with the occasional heat of a green jalapeño. But above all, it's that crunch of bread — fresh, feathery, and very French — that makes this hard to beat. Add dessert of home-made banana shrimp cake and Vietnamese coffee and — *voila!* Open daily, breakfast

When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Vietnamese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gourmet delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations ac-cepted for all meals, including weekend n sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in made-to-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate, with moderate splurges like live fish and Peking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). One of San Diego's hidden jewels: there's classic American fare (honey-glazed pork tenderloin, farmhouse chicken) in the "Officers' mess," but better yet is the free buffet Happy Hour — pig heaven weekdays from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Selections might include a "stroganoff" of Polish sausage, veggies, cheese potatoes, nachos, etc. (Of course, you have to buy something — say, a pitcher of Bud for two.) Thursdays and Fridays, the outside "Runway" grill features kebabs. The biggest attraction is the place itself. Built to mimic a WWI French farmhouse taken over by a bunch of Yankee flying aces, it has a garden full of antique planes and live ducks - and right outside, the real Montgomery airfield. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (11/00)

24-Hour Valley Kitchen Family Restaurant 875 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-819-1017 or 619-298-8282. Great when everything else is closed. The place feels like a Mid-western chain eatery: all carpets, darkwood walls, etched glass. Prices are a little up there, but hot French dip is great and burgers are generous. Best news may be that if you feel like breakfast at midnight, no problem. Ask for the pork chops, two eggs, hash browns, and bis-

You know because the first things you see are guaraná, the Ama-zonian energy drink, and açaï, the Amazonian palm berry energy bowl. If you're not strapped for cash, go for the popu-lar *feijoada* stew, black beans cooked slowly with "six types of pork and two kinds of beef," offered Saturday and Sunday. If you don't have the dough, have what most of Brazil eats every day: the "PF," *prato feito* ("ready plate"). It's beef, chicken, or fish with rice and Brazilian beans. End with the cheapest dessert, the wicked brigadeiro. Come early evening or weekends and you might learn the forro ("fo-ha"), a Brazilian dance. Open seven days; closes early Monday and Tuesday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/04)

Gringo's 4474 Mission Boulevard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-490-2877. With better cooking than you'd guess from its name, this ambitious spin-off of the local Moondoggies chain serves the sort of Mexican cuisine you might find at a seaside resort in Cabo or Puerto Vallarta — skillfully prepared with good, fresh ingredients, just a bit dumbed-down in the flavors. The chile verde, say, is beautifully seasoned if barely *picante*, and the luscious *ca*marones borrachos are big white shrimp cooked just till done and not a moment more. Given the surefire location at the hub of PB partytown, the food is actually better than it needs to be. A vast list of tequilas, interesting margaritas, and a sensible wine list emphasizing afford-able, food-friendly Chilean bottlings add to the draw for a lively young crowd that revs the decibels to a roar on weekends. But to go all-out Hawaiian, try the pork lau lau (pork and butterfish wrapped in taro leaves), slow-cooked *kalua* pig (don't call it pork) with cabbage, or *limu* poke (seaweed and raw tuna). Barbecue? Their BBQ Mix (Hawaiian BBQ beef, chicken, short ribs, with rice or macaroni salad) is a deal. Authentic? Count the Hawaiians around you. Lunch and dinner daily. The Mission Cafe and Coffee House 3795 Mission Boulevard (at San Jose Place), Mission Beach, 858-488-9060. Gourmet and Latino breakfasts served in funky surroundings. Outstanding are cinnamon French toast blackberry-banana pancakes, and roast beef hash with rosemary potatoes and eggs. Chino-Latino lunch items. All dishes plus fabulous bread, scones, muffins, available for take-out. Open daily 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. E.W.

People's Organic Foods Co-op Deli 4765 Voltaire Street, Ocean Beach, 619-224-1387. This is the land of "or-ganic," "cruelty-free," "environmentally safe," "shade-grown." Vegan Country. People look either disgustingly healthy, disturbingly pasty, or just plain smug. But the food tastes pretty good. And they sell it by the pound so you can mix and match. Course, you have to learn new words, like tempeh (cultured soy which can be made to taste like anything). And dishes have a sensible momsy East Coast feel - garlic eggplant with beet root and onions, tempeh loaf, sweet squash and rice, millet spinach bake, shepherd's pie, "mango madness," tempeh sausage steamed vegetables, vegan macaroni and cheese. Bottom line: it's guilt-free. Open seven days, breakfast, lunch, dinner (but "serious" breakfasts Saturday and Sun-day only). Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/03)

The Surfside 4527 Mission Boulevard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-273-2979. In the evenings, it's a "scene" here — for good reason. You'll find fresh sushi, sashimi, and "California coastal cuisine," i.e., fun and flavorful fusion-y tapas, many of them going for half-price during weeknight Happy Hours. You can actually reserve for the sushi bar (it'll put you at the head of the line), where the chefs are unusually

friendly. They shine on simple, pure Japanese sushi, although they make the usual "party rolls," too. Most seafood is of fine quality (except the toro, which seems to have problems). For those preferring a tapas-style sit-down meal, there's a breezy, informal dining room with large windows looking out on the street, plus a small private dining room for parties. Four Japanese beers, 10 sakes available. Reservations urged for large groups. Parking is tight; just one handi-capped slot in front lot. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (10/02)

Sushi Ota 4529 Mission Bay Drive (at Bunker Hill Street), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5670. What becomes a legend most? At its best, this renowned sushi bar offers fish of exceptional quality, perfect tart-sweet rice, tight wraps, and disciplined creativity. These joys don't come easily. First, find the place: Driving south from Balboa, look left, and pull into the mini-mall with the large 7-11 sign (opposite Rubio's). Sit at the sushi bar to snoop on your neighbors' choices, watching for off-menu extravaganzas. Don't miss the *ama-ebi* with crisp shrimp heads, atypically flash-baked (not batter-fried). Cooked dishes are dull except for chawan-mushi (custard broth with gingko nuts). Alas, when Ota-san's away, his elves may play — amateurishly. Best bet: Reserve a bar seat when the master's most likely to be present. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner daily. Disabled access chancy. Long, crowded waits unless you've reserved. CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Los Reyes 2496 Broadway (at 25th), Encanto, 619-231-0716. If you've ever craved those fabulous Mexican fish soups that can be such energy restorers, these strip-mall Mexican restaurants have a great one. It's *Caldo 7 Mares* (Seven Seas Soup) and it comes as a big bowl of savory red fish soup clunking with giant crab legs, clams, chunks of white fish, shrimp, the pink and purple suckers of octopus, and vegetables. It's also called *Vuelva a la vida:* "Return to life." On a hot day, their Cocktail Campechana (shrimp and octopus in a light, spicy tomato broth) will return you to life, too. Four brothers and one sister from Michoacan run the place. A very

(Smaller branches at 47th and Market, 25th and Imperial, and 1270 Picador Boulevard.) Cash only. Inexpensive. -E.B. (5/03)

Mailo's Cafe 4095 30th Street, North Park, 619-528-1602. OK, so Mailo's is a Greek café and Mailo and Blanca aren't Greek, they're Mexican-American. On the other hand. Mailo cooked in an OB Greek restaurant for 14 years before he opened here. Plus, the two have made Greek extremely affordable. Prices are definitely down there for their breakfast gyros, with eggs, lamb, tomatoes, and onion wrapped in a hot pita. And they have this great street-corner outside deck to eat on. There's also plenty of American standard fare. Mailo's cheeseburger, with avocado and bacon, is the most popular, with the half-pound steak burger close behind. American breakfasts are the old fashioned kind with three eggs any style, hash browns, and toast, plus ham or bacon or sausage or even chicken fried steak, at bargain prices. Same for their roast beef dinner, or the quarter chicken, Greek style, served with rice, salad, and pita bread. Open Tuesday through Saturday breakfast through dinner, Sunday and Mon-day till 4 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

Phoenicia 3381 Adams Avenue (at 34th Street), Normal Heights, 619-282-4120. To find this tiny restaurant — the longest-running eatery on Adams Avenue - look for a window featuring a cedar tree (the symbol on the Lebanese flag), an American flag, and the word "Phoenicia" written in Arabic and English. The inside is cramped, but they have sidewalk tables, too. Try their baked eggplant stuffed with lamb, pine nuts, onions, and garlic, or the kafta kabob, with ground meat, parsley, onions, and pita bread. The real treat is the kibbeh neveh, raw lamb with cracked wheat, onions, and seasonings, but you'll need to call 24 hours ahead to get it. Homemade rose juice and Lebanese coffees are delicious, too. Bakery open mornings; restaurant lunch and early dinner. Inexpensive. - E.B. (11/00)

Saigon 4455 El Cajon Boulevard, City Heights, 619-284-4215 or 619-284-4288 You're in a big glass palace here. It's es-pecially good on Sundays, when threeor four-generation Vietnamese families gather for lunch. Gaggles of waiters hover a glance away, but take your time. The menu has over 250 items on it. De-

fault choice: *pho*, the famous, filling soup-meal of Vietnam where beef cooks in the soup. Another safe bet is stir-fried crispy or soft egg noodle with seafood and assorted vegetables. "33" Vietnamese beer is on hand to make Saigon lovers sentimental. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01) Trieu Chau Restaurant 4653 Uni-

versity Avenue, City Heights, 619-280-4204. This is as near as you'll come to eating breakfast in Phnom Penh or lunch in Vientiane. Cambodians come in the morning to talk politics and play Cambodian chess. At lunch, Laotians replace them. Maps of "Kampuchea" decorate the walls, as well as long-distance telephone ads. The menu includes Chinese, Khmer, and Lao dishes. In the morning, ask for "djak kvai coffay dok ko" - fried bread with Cambodian coffee, the standard French-Khmer breakfast. Later in the day, you might try pan-fried noodles with broc-coli and beef or shrimp and gravy ("koitiow bahat sai kho"). If in doubt, ask for Kathy, who speaks Chinese, Khmer, Lao — and English. Open daily, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00) **Turf Supper Club** 1116 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-234-6363. At this cozy saloon (a landmark since 1950, "re-established" in 1998), if your meat's done wrong, it's your own fault. And that's the menu. The only side dish is a simple salad — not even fries. But the meat's a treat, especially the huge, juicy Delmonico rib eye. Their six-page plastic menu tells all — forget your diet and dig into the breakfast "Eggs and Cakes" (two eggs, three pancakes), the "Touchdown" (two eggs, two hotcakes, four strips of bacon or three link sausages), or the "Monte Cristo" hot sandwich (ham and turkey grilled on batter-dipped Texas toast with Swiss cheese, hot syrup, and French fries). Later in the day, the New York strip or sirloin steak with all the trimmings, and desserts like homemade cinnamon bread pudding with raisins and whipped cream. Open three meals, seven days. Still, the place seems full of happiness and friendliness: yellow and orange walls, plenty of smiles amid the bustle. Soups receive lavish attention, and sometimes live up to their billing — the blood orange and roasted butternut squash soup is delicious, dark and complex. The generous, marvelous lavender-infused crème brûlée makes this a dessert destination - pause to sniff a spoonful before slipping it between your lips. Inexpensive to moderate. —

A.M. (4/01) Bread and Cie 350 University Avenue (at Fourth), Hillcrest, 619-683-9322, At least twenty breads emerge daily from this bakery's 10,000-pound French stone hearth oven. Most are dense, crusty, and delicious French or Italian peasant breads, including the outstanding anise fig and black olive loaves that are served in many top local restaurants. Scones brownies, muffins, banana bread, and cookies are the sweet side of the house. Focaccia pizza and sandwiches (many with thick-sliced bread and rather thin fillings) are available to take out or eat on the spot - inside the café or on the sidewalk patio. Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. N.W. (6/02)

Cafe on Park 3831 Park Boulevard (at University), Hillcrest, 619-293-7275. Okay, it's trendy, from the rusty spoonand-fork sign at the door to the PC industrial interior (concrete walls, exposed plumbing). But don't expect PC food. The plates are huge and overflowing with fodder. Breakfast scrambles are popular with add-ons such as smoked salmon. artichoke hearts, or brie cheese. Health nuts choose the Park Porridge stuffed with apples, raisins, and honey. But the prize may be the dish that Placerville. California, miners ordered when they came down from the mountains with pockets full of gold: the Hangtown Fry - luscious marinated sautéed ovsters scrambled in eggs. Lunch has deals too: the roasted eggplant is cheap and good. Three meals Tuesday through Saturday; only breakfast and lunch Sunday and Monday (line at door on Sunday). - E.B. (10/01)

Cafe Pacifica 2414 San Diego Avenue (next to Old Town graveyard), Old Town, 619-291-6666. The fare here is mainly very fresh seafood, either fusioned up and somewhat chancy, or grilled simply and reliably excellent. Among the highlights are a clean-limned clam chowder, some amusing yellowfinstuffed wontons, crab-stuffed portobello mushrooms, and luscious mustardcrusted Oregon catfish. On the downside, Mexican pink abalone are tiny, over-breaded, and overpriced. Several good grilled meats are available for fishscorners. Optional valet parking \$4. Wheelchair lot and ramp behind restaurant (ask valet to direct you). Often very noisy. Serious, rather steep California wine list; full bar. Daily, dinner only. Upper moderate to expensive. Fifth and Hawthorn 515 Hawthorn Street (at Fifth), Banker's Hill, 619-544-0940. This warm, cozy cottage near Balboa Park offers once-radical dishes that have long since turned into familiar California comfort cuisine. The menu changes only slightly, and the kitchen has the dishes down so pat that execution is almost flawless. It's a little like an ideal airplane dinner - on the Concorde, say. Highlights include spicy duck soup, tender stuffed chicken breast melting calamari steaks, and mustardcoated catfish. Most weeknights, couples can opt for a "wine dinner" that includes four courses and a decent bottle of — a great bargain. Full bar, reawine sonable California-dominated wine list. Good pre-theatre dinner spot (near the Old Globe); let server know your curtain time. No wheelchair access to rest rooms. Dinner nightly. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (2/03)

Jack and Giulio's Italian Restau**rant** 2391 San Diego Avenue (at Arista), Old Town, 619-294-2074. After more than four decades in business, this father (Giulio) and son (Jack) operation manages to stay fresh. The antipasto salad with its thin-cut prosciutto and salami will get your juices flowing, or try the mango salad, with fresh mango, raisins, and sweet onions. All the traditional Italian entrées like veal parmigiana and fettuccine Alfredo are there, but go for the house specialties like Spaghetti New Orleans with shrimp, crawfish, and crab meat, or the expensive scampi dishes. Broke? Get a simple Angel Hair Mediter-raneo or rigatoni with meat sauce to enjoy out on the patio. Open for lunch and dinner, seven days. Moderate. — E.B. (5/04)

Khyber Pass 523 University Avenue (at Fifth Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-294-7579. The room's very modern, but Afghan cuisine is full of history, carrying echoes of both Persian and Indian foods, with even a hint of Greek (Alexander the Great conquered the re-gion). Dinners feature kebabs, tandooris, curries, and some unique regional specialties. Flavors are exotic but oddly comfortable to the cosmopolitan palate. Among the don't-miss items are the outstanding aushak (spring onion ravioli) and mantu (ground-meat ravioli) both with lively yogurt sauces — and zamordd chalow, a spicy lamb-andspinach stew. Save room for the sexy desserts. Can be noisy inside; small sidewalk patio. Private dining room upstairs bookable for parties. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (9/02)

Ono Sushi and Pacific Spice 1236 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-0616. If you are searching for huge portions, fresh tasty food and reasonable prices, don't overlook this colorful Japanese/Pacific Rim café. Excellent specialty rolls, entrées, appetizers. Very crowded weekends; lively young crowd. Dinners nightly; open for lunch Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. - E.W. (11/98)

Pomegranate Russian-Georgian Restaurant 2302 El Cajon Boulevard (northeast corner of Louisiana), University Heights, 619-297-4007. Pomegranate's address is serendipitous, since the food of Deep-South Georgia is the Louisiana cuisine of the Slavic world — alive with fresh herbs, garlic, touches of hot pepper. This rustic-looking restaurant is animated with antic humor (check the multilingual graffiti on the walls) and offers unique, flavorbomb dishes. Don't miss the world-beating beefy, herb-jungle borscht (beet soup, but it's way more than that), the Lobio bean dip, and Olivier salad. The chef slow-smokes his moist barbecued beef and pork and cold-smokes whole trout, a treat as a group appetizer or sum-mer entrée. On weekends, there's sublimely smoky *shashlik* (a.k.a. shish ke-bab). The printed menu is only a hint as to what's really cooking, and regular pa-trons get the best off-menu choices. So become a regular. Street parking is dire. Reservations advised for weekend dinners. Dinner nightly, service until 11 p.m. on weekends. Moderate. — N.W. (1/04)

Rice Jones 3687 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-291-1887. It's probably no coincidence that Anglo-Asian families seem to come here. Rice Iones's owner Anh Long had two good ideas: one, to provide rice with just about everything usually sautéed with mushrooms and herbs, so customers can fill up without busting the bank), and two, to bridge the taste gap between Vietnam and California. She offers lemongrass chicken, and a turkey burger next to a Vietnamese grilled eggplant. Most exotic: "shrimp wrap," a shrimp patty wrapped around a sugarcane stick with rice noodles. It's a cliché, but they treat you like family here, no matter which side of the pond you come from. Lunch and dinner, closed Sunday. Inexpensive. E.B. (5/03)

Sushi Itto Sushi Itto, 441 Washington, Hillcrest, 619-291-6060. Don't come here looking for Japanese food. This is *Mexican* sushi, from a chain based in Mexico City that's dedicated to creating

rolls for Mexican tastes. Nearly all the party rolls feature cream cheese and avocado and most include a shot of hot spice and some fake crab (*surimi*), too. In their own way, they're fun, so long as you're prepared to give up any puristic standards and go with the flow. But don't bother with the plain *nigiri* — the rice lacks classic sushi seasonings (and is of-ten dry), and the seafood is too mediocre to be appealing in simple preparations. Rock-bottom prices, though. Another branch is in the Gaslamp at 409 F Street. 619-237-1037. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. - N.W. (8/05)

Terra 3900 Vermont Street, Uptown Shopping Center, Hillcrest, 619-293-7088. Co-owner Jeff Rossman, formerly in charge of the front of the house, has moved into the kitchen to serve as chef at this comfortable neighborhood spot, serving venturesome, if uneven, tropical-influenced American cooking. You can settle in a spacious southwest-tinged dining room or people-watch from a sheltered outdoor patio (with smoking permitted). Generously sized tapas can serve as appetizers or as a sustaining bite before venturing into Trader Joe's across the street. The dinner menu changes seasonally, featuring barbecue items during the summer, comforting fare in colder weather, and special dinners on all major holidays. Good wine list with several flights available, full bar with tropical cocktails (Pisco Sours, Caipirinhas, etc.). Reservations advised, especially for weekends, holidays and special events (e.g., Sunday "blues and barbecue" during the summer). Saturday and Sunday three meals, weekdays lunch and dinner. Moderate. Athens Market 109 West F Street (between First and Front), 619-234-1955. Alex Spanos and lots of local hotshots come here for honest Greek home cookin'. Yes, it's classy white table cloths, linen napkins — but you can fill up on just a bowl of *fakee*, owner Mary Pappas's "secret recipe" lentil soup, and an appetizer, like spanakopita (spinach and cheese pastry pockets). And entrées like arni psitoroast leg of lamb — are guaranteed to stuff you. They come with rice, roast potato, a vegetable, soup or salad, and French bread and butter — all at a darned good price. Oh, and don't despise the gyro. Meat flavor's great, and it takes a football player to empty this plate. Lunch Monday through Friday; dinner nightly, to 10 p.m. on Friday and

Bud's Louisiana Food Shop 2034 Kettner Boulevard (at Grape, next to the Waterfront Bar), Little Italy, 619-239-4210. Bud Deslattes, a New Orleans native, was the original chef-owner of the late Bayou Bar and Grille and the inventor of the legendary white choco-late bread pudding served there. Now he's cooking it in this cute, casual eatery A brief but choice menu features au thentic Cajun-Creole specialties, to eat-in or "to geaux." (If taking out, ask for your rice on the side.) Among the treats are a fine seafood bisque, crawfish étouffée, and a "cupa-cupa-cupa" sampling of gumbo, jambalaya, and red beans and rice. For lunch, check out the roast beef po' boy. Some Louisiana grocery items intermittently available at retail (frozen andouille, tasso, crawfish, etc.). Parking's usually a pain but worth it. Beer and generic wine. Closed Sunday and Monday. Inexpensive. — *N.W. (2/05)*

Cabo Cafe & Grill 808 West Cedar (near Pacific Coast Highway), Little Italy, 619-595-1618. This miracle restaurant is run by homeless kids from the Monarch School Project next door, with a little help (okay, a lot) from Rubio's and its founder Ralph. He helped raise a million dollars to get the school and the restaurant running. Think Starbucks meets Taco Bell (oops, sorry Ralph). The place is like its kid-staff: smart, cheery (they painted all the seals and porpoise murals), with a great fountain-gurgling patio outside. Try the grilled burrito (grilled chicken or steak with gua-camole, roasted salsa, sour cream, black beans, Mexican rice, and melted Jack cheese in a warm tortilla) or, as a great filler, the Cabo Maestro Bowl, with marinated grilled chicken or steak in a bowl with black beans, Mexican rice, cheeses guacamole, and shredded cabbage. And

yes, they do make the Rubio fish taco. Daily specials. Open weekdays, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. - E.B. (5/02) Candelas 416 Third Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-4455. Don't look for tacos here — Chef Eduardo Baeza specializes in alta cocina, a luxurious, inventive combination of traditional Mexican fare and French techniques. In a handsome Spanish-style dining room (romantic but rather noisy) with gracious service, the menu emphasizes seafood, including a signature dish of luscious stuffed Maine lobster. Plenty for meat lovers, too, with fine Black Angus cuts inventively garnished. But the

menu and ingredients have been somewhat compromised over the years to ac-commodate the "Dude, where's my taco?" conventioneers. The choices are more Dude-friendly ---- that is, less ven-turesome than they might be, and execution can be uneven. In the lounge at 10 p.m. on weekends, the music cranks up and the scene goes disco (with a cover charge for nondiners; IDs checked). Reservations advised, required on week ends; slightly dressy. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly until 11 p.m. Interesting but expensive wine list; food expensive or higher. — N.W. (1/04)

Edgewater Grill 861 W. Harbor Drive, Seaport Village, 619-232-7581. An easy walk from the Convention Center, the dining room is spacious and handsome, and the view from the crowded dining terrace is optimal (the bay, the Coronado Bridge, a park, etc.). The menu, though, is convention-centered — like a Howard Johnson's for the 21st century. The fare features middle-of-the-road faux-fusion salads seafood, grilled steaks, pastas (most with shellfish), and individual pizzas, plus daily fin-fish dishes listed on a card in a plastic holder on the table. The lighter dishes are the most successful — this is not a bad place to "graze" on appetizers and a mini-pizza when you're starved for a view Difficult wheelchair access to terrace. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Entrées high moderate to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

Fat City Steakhouse 2137 Pacific Highway (at Hawthorn), Little Italy, 619-232-9303. In the Deco "pink palace" at the edge of downtown, the USDA Choice steaks (and one velvety Prime cut) are cooked over mesquite charcoal, which lends them a deliciously smoky campfire flavor. Don't like beef? You can choose nicely grilled chicken, pork, or salmon; two vegan pastas; or scampi. The appetizer list is mainly trite pub grub, but the fry cook does a great job with calamari. And in fair weather, the lush garden dining patio is a little piece of Eden. Full bar, rather basic wine list. Casual ambience, above-average wheelchair access from large, free parking lot. Dinner nightly, 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (12/02)

Gen Lai Sen Hakka Seafood **Restaurant** 1065 12th Avenue (at C Street), downtown, 619-239-5478 or 619-239-5479. Across the street from City College, you'll encounter a split personality. The good twin provides su-perb Hakka dishes, a style developed by a nomadic people originally from north-west China, now residents of mainly the south China coast. The bad twin dishes out gluey cornstarch-ridden stir-fries for starving students. But it's easy to tell which twin is which: The "chef recommend sizzle plates," the hot pots that taste like home cooking (best ordered by four or more), the greaseless fried rice, the noodles (especially "house special rice noodles"), and the whole steamed fish-of-the-day are palpable hits. And if you really want to know what the fuss about Hakka is all about,

try the sizzle plate stuffed tofu — these deep-fried crisp rectangles with a pork meatball inserted in each tender center resemble meat-flavored roasted marshmallows, and may just change your mind about bean curd. Open brunch through dinner daily, 10:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Pleasant service, very casual, mainly inexpensive. — N.W. (10/01)

The Honey Bee Hive Bar and Grill 1065 14th Street (at C), East Village, 619-702-6010. Seems like half the students and staff of City College are popping across the road to this cellar-dive. Why the bee theme? A hive of real bees once lived in here. Try the Bee Keeper burger (a half-pound cheese-burger), the King Bee honey-lemon grilled chicken sandwich or wrap, or the Queen Bee, a Cajun honey-grilled chicken sandwich or wrap. Also loved by the more affluent college staff: Big Daddy's 12-ounce steak with baked potato and salad. Open weekdays for lunch till late afternoon. Inexpensive. – E.B. (9/04)

Las Cuatro Milpas 1857 Logan Avenue, Barrio Logan, 619-234-4460. This isn't a restaurant, it's a legend. The same Estudillo family has been serving old-fashioned Mexican food here for three generations — seventy years. Rice, beans, pork tacos (they don't serve beef), pork tamales, chorizo with eggs — that's about it. So how come they have lines outside every day? Blame a potent mix-ture of sentiment and the lard they refuse to abandon. Folks say that lard flavor is the real Mexico. Also famous: their Saturday menudo. Warning: go easy with their deep wine-colored hot sauce. It's room-rocker strength. The name? From a famous mariachi song, "The Four Cornfields." Open morning to mid-afternoon, Monday to Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/03)

Pete's Quality Meats 1742-1/2 In-dia Street, Little Italy, 619-234-1684. Pete's Meats was just a butcher's shop until Pete's daughter and sister-in-law got the idea to set up a grill there. Now afficionados line up for Sicilian specialties like Italian-sausage sandwiches, steak sandwiches, and especially spitini - veal rolled around two cheeses onions, tomatoes, pine nuts, currants, parsley, prosciutto, and breadcrumbs. Pete stuffs all of that into a hot bun with marinara sauce, sautéed peppers, and onions as packing. Nuff said? Inexpen-sive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

Rama 327 Fourth Avenue (near K Street), Gaslamp, 619-501-8424. This large, handsome restaurant is the younger brother of Celadon in Hillcrest. It's named for the king of Thailand and offers Thai cuisine fit for royalty, made with top ingredients (including Chino Farms produce). The menu includes all the popular favorites but adds authentic dishes rarely found locally, such as chicken and squid with flat noodles and caramelized palm sugar, and a wicked Thai version of Chinese twice-cooked pork — a fat-fest made with unsmoked bacon. Soups and curries are based on freshly made coconut cream of swoony richness. The extensive wine list, un-usual in this genre, offers affordable, food-friendly choices plus an interesting reserve list. Full bar. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner nightly. Moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

Rei Do Gado Churrascuria 939 Fourth Avenue (between E and Broadway), Gaslamp, 619-702-8464. The meats just keep on coming at a Brazilian rodizio: skewer after skewer of chur rasco (Brazilian barbecue), a near-endless procession of rotisserie-grilled meats and poultry. At each table there's a wooden cone with one end red and the other end green. Turn the green side up to start the servers parading to your table, offering you tastes cut from long spits of salty, simply seasoned pork, poultry, ribs, sausages, and numerous cuts of beef. Turn the cone red side up to take a break from the protein parade The gargantuan spread includes a buf-fet in the front of the restaurant with a changeable array of alluring side dishes, salads, fruit, and such intriguing hot entrées as Brazilian oxtail stew or seafood in coconut milk, with exotic but oddly comfortable flavors. There's always a potful of feijoada, the national dish slow-cooked, meaty black beans (in a somewhat bland version, which you can liven up with a splash of hot sauce). No matter how often you eat here, you'll never have the same meal twice. Reservations advisable for weekends. Full bar (have a Caipirinha). No doggie-bags. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate (considering the food amount); prices higher on weekends. — N.W. (10/02)

Sadaf 828 Fifth Avenue (at E Street), Gaslamp, 619-338-0008. Vegetarian friendly. Quiet and relaxed weeknights, the room becomes an ear-splitting mob scene weekends (even before the restaurant goes disco at 9:30). The hearty but sophisticated Persian fare centers on well-marinated kebabs and herb-rich stews, served with various savory rice dishes. There's excellent spinach *borani*, sieved yogurt relish with cucumbers, lamb chop kebabs, and a vibrant, sweetsour *fesenjan* (pomegranate-walnut sauce with chicken). But the Gaslamp branch's kitchen is wildly inconsistent, e.g., your *fesenjan* dumped on dry ke-babs instead of mingling with simmered poultry. Desserts are always dreamy — try rosewater ice cream and/or pudding, or barrieh, a delicate ladyfinger soaked in (what else?) rosewater syrup. Moderate. — N.W. (12/00)

The best food is upstairs. You can get tapas in the restaurant and entrées at the bar, and in either case the choices are varied, interesting, and highly cosmopolitan, executed with wonderful consistency. Be sure to look for something that includes potatoes; the humble spud gets Cinderella treatment here. No reservations (or wheelchairs) at tapas bar; reservations strongly recommended for dining

room. Dinner daily. Moderate. – N.W. (2/01) The Westgate Gourmet Deli-

catessen Third Avenue, between Broadway and C Street, downtown 619-557-3698. This is where you take your respectable Aunt Martha for lunch. The place reeks of gentility. Green carpets, white linen cloths, fresh flowers chandeliers, giant potted palms. It's part of the Westgate hotel, and looks like a grocery for the rich who just can't live without specialty olive oils and expensive wines. But prices for sandwiches, light breakfasts, and lunches are down there with the best Market Street liquor-deli. Among the menu items of fered, the best deal is the soup and halfsandwich combo, especially the Friday cioppino: a tomato-based soup filled with fish such as sea bass, shrimp, shark, lobster, and scallops. Cilantro Live! 315-1/2 3rd Avenue, Chula Vista, 619-827-7401. Look in Cristina Guzmán's kitchen: no ovens, no burners. Only warmers. Her theory? Never heat food above 112 degrees or the enzymes will die. Enzymes? They're life. They give you energy and do your digestion for you. What's amazing is how much real-looking and -tasting food she can create with raw nuts and twigs. And fruit. And especially seeds. She creates "tuna" wraps (using sunflower-pump-kin seed pâté), burgers (using flax seeds) "meat" loaf (using walnuts) — all pretty credible and edible. Drinks? The margaritas (green apple with ginger, lime, and cinnamon) have to be good: Ms. Guzmán comes from Mexico City. Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday, Inexpensive, - E.B. (1/04)

Coronado Boathouse 1887 1701 Strand Way, Coronado, 619-435-0155. For a relaxing good time with lovely views and tasty food to match, put on your aloha shirt and head over the bridge. The old Coronado Boathouse boasts a handsome, historic structure with architecture mirroring the nearby Hotel Del, plus enthusiastic servers, terrific water views, and satisfying mainstream American cooking. The herbed artichoke appetizer is wonderful, as is the very fresh macadamia-crusted halibut sauced with coconut milk. The juicy roast beef here is USDA Prime (translates to "melt in your mouth") and even the desserts offer some old favorites cooked with classy ingredients and imaginative twists. A perfect place to entertain your in-laws or hold your birthday dinner. Full bar. Dinner seven days (weekends until 1 a.m.), moderate to expensive. -N.W. (10/04)

Da Kine's Plate Lunches 1635 Sweetwater Road (at Prospect), National

City, 619-477-8494. Also at 4120 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-274-8494. You go here for your Pa-cific Island fix — hundreds of Hawaiians do, every day. Filipino Desserts Plus 2220-O East Plaza Boulevard, National City, 619-479-6748; also at 8955-F Mira Mesa Boulevard (inside Seafood City), Mira Mesa, 858-271-5754. Filipinos often mix sweet and savory, so it's no surprise that this desserts place has regular dishes too. including *adobo* pork, *pancit*, and *lumpia*. *Diniguan*, a Filipino specialty, is



The little blue under-the-freeway shack has been serving up *cervezas*, BBQ, and burgers to sailors and shipbuilders since 1934, most of the time as "Club 13." Traditionally, Hell's Angels visited it on their north-south tour of California's oldest bars. In 1993, Linda, the latest owner, added the ro-mantic "Moonlight On The Sea" moniker. She prepares and hand-rolls her own lumpia, and it shows. It has a nice fresh veggie, marinated-meat taste And of course the grilled cheese sandwiches, wings, cheeseburgers, and dinnertime doubleburgers fit right into this wonderful throwback bar. Lunch, dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. -E.B. (10/02)

Peohe's The Landing, 1201 First Street, Coronado, 619-437-4474. This gor-geous, view-endowed restaurant offers upscale, Hawaiian-inspired fish and gar-gantuan steaks in a plush tropical-style setting with indoor waterfalls and three separate patios. Given the visual splendor, much of the food is better than it needs to be, featuring top-quality seafood prepared with care, e.g., halibut in a lush, sassy Frangelico-touched macadamia beurre blanc. A chocolate shell filled with macadamia nut ice cream may be worth the calories, too. Full bar. Reservations advised. Lunch (with limited breakfast) Monday through Saturday; brunch Sunday. Dinner nightly. Expensive. — N.W. (3/01)

Swaddee Thai 1001 C Avenue (a 10th Street), Coronado, 619-435-8110. Tourists never stray to Swadee's quiet residential location a block from the bright lights of Orange Avenue. Their loss is the locals' gain. The dining room is a quiet, lovely haven from the hustle; the service is caring and gracious. Even if the long list of Siamese specialties is merely standard, the kitchen, too, is devoted to the art of gently giving pleasure. The peanut sauce accompanying the saté, for instance, is classically balanced; the complex but soothing coconutchicken soup can wash away all cares; and the calamari in the many seafood arrays is cleverly knife-scored to achieve sheer tenderness along with good looks Even the jasmine rice is an exceptionally fragrant brand. Unless you specify otherwise, spicy dishes have a nice nip tuned to brave but tender *farang* tastebuds. Lunch and dinner Monday through Sat-urday; dinner only Saturday. Cien Anos Calle José Maria Velazco #1407, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-3039 or 634-7262. This lovely, comfortable dressy-casual "destination restaurant serves extraordinary Mexican haute cui-sine, graced with a brilliant variety of sauces based on elaborations of Mexican ingredients, including tropical fruits, nuts, and above all a vast variety of chile peppers, each with its own distinctive flavor (not all of them spicy). You could eat here a dozen times and not begin to exhaust the possibilities. Just a few of the treats are mushrooms steeped in beef marrow, crocodile meat mini-tacos, po zole with crab meat, and an irresistible beef and shrimp stew. (Food critic Ruth Reichl consumed a meal of exotic Aztec delicacies, including ant roe and mezcal worms, and you can try them too when they're in season.) The wine list is devoted wholly to ambitious Baja wineries; you're also welcome to BYO. Bar choices , include damiana and hibiscus liqueurs. Menu and staff are bilingual. Reservations strongly advised; ask for directions. Moderate. - N.W. (1/04)

La Fonda Baja Highway 1, Km. 59 (Alisios exit from toll-road, about halfway between Rosarito and Ensenada, near CESUN Universidad), 661-628-7352. It's hard to imagine a better start to the day, in any sweeter ambiance, than at La Fonda ("The Inn"), which offers Mexican and American breakfast dishes and a lavish Sunday brunch buffet with both. Arrive early for patio seating under a straw umbrella with a full-out ocean view. The bilingual menu is written on chalkboards and dinner choices change nightly, featuring American and Mexican seafood entrées and deluxe meats aged in-house. Most staffers speak some English. Full bar, including Baja-grown wines. Open daily, three meals, starting about 9 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate; cash only. — N.W. (4/03)

La Lena Agua Caliente Boulevard #11191, Tijuana, 686-2920. The nicest thing about La Leña ("The Fire Log") is its view. You come off noisy, fumey, traffic-wracked Agua Caliente into this quiet, dark-wood, creamy-yellow walled room and a full view of ... countryside! Actually, a green golf course studded with trees. In the middle of Tijuana? Golfers thwack balls, giant mowers look like Star Wars creatures. So no surprise that you get country-club type eating open-grill charro food for well-to-do arros. Old-style BBQ steaks, surf-andturf combos, and big slabs of Mexicancut filete cabrería, which are flabby but tender. Most arrive at your table sizzling on black iron hotplates. Servings are gen erous (meals come with soup or salad and you get a free appetizer such as

Malecon de Puerto Nuevo Northwest edge of Puerto Nuevo; take Calle Entrada (entry road) to the ocean-front bluff, edge right, and walk about 30 feet down a steep dirt road running seaward from the street-market on the oceanside edge of town. Look for a yellow building with blue trim and a terrace with um brellas. Worth looking for. This great, honest little restaurant harks back to the original, uncommercialized "lobster village" before it got its capital letters and written menus. Open since August, 2002, it's owned by an active fisherman, who serves (as much as weather permits) fresh-caught local lobsters and genuine "daily catch" with standard sides - superb frijoles, red rice, real melted butter - and that's all. The first-course ceviche,

when available, is astonishingly flavorful with fish caught that very morning; in harsher weather, a hearty, warming fish chowder substitutes. Breaking from Puerto Nuevo tradition, when the lob-ster is fresh caught it's simply split and grilled, not lard-fried first, and all the better for it. Some staffers are bilingual. Open brunch through dinner. No reservations, cash only. Low moderate. -N.W. (11/02)

Manzanilla Riveroll 122 (off Lopez Mateo), Ensenada, Baja Mexico, 646-175-7073. At this art-filled, very "Euro" bistro, a pair of gifted, classically trained chef-owners are pioneering "new Mexican cuisine," creating sophisticated combinations of superb local products and traditional Mexican flavors. Freshcaught seafood, local-grown vegetables and mesquite smoke from the woodburning grill are featured players on the seasonal menus; a spectacular rib-eye steak, tender and intensely beefy, is also a constant. Little wonder this has become the destination restaurant south of Tijuana. The menu is in Spanish, but owners Benito Molina and Solange Muris Evans speak fluent English, as do some wait staff. (The only communication

problem will be the exotic music blasting on the sound system.) Reserve for weekends, especially during tourist sea-sons. Full bar featuring tequilas, Baja vintners. Wednesday through Saturday, late lunch through dinner, until midnight. Moderate. - N.W. (9/04)

Original Ortega's In Puerto Nuevo, next to Casa de la Langosta, on the first street to your left (Calle Principal) after entering town through the entry gate. Open since 1952, this is the original "Lobster Village" restaurant, and not much has changed. Eventually Ortega's grew into an octopus with multiple arms in Puerto Nuevo and Rosarito Beach, all pretty similar. The menu is longer than most, with numerous starters (including a tasty ceviche and an excellent tortilla soup), varied seafood entrées and antojitos, desserts, and even fancy coffees (including "Viagra," which features reputedly aphrodisiac Damiana herbal liqueur). The spiny lobsters (once local but now from who-knows-where) are first fried in lard, then finished off on the grill, and served with a greasy-tasting melted "Kitchen Maid" margarine blend, frijoles, rice, tortillas, and salsa. Full bar, English menu, staff marginally bilingual. Moderate to high, but with low-moderate specials. No reservations, cash only. — N.W. (11/02)

Bully's East 2401 Camino del Rio South, Mission Valley, 619-291-2665. Also at 5755 La Jolla Boulevard, La Jolla (858-459-2768), and 1404 Camino del Mar, Del Mar (858-755-1660). Despite the plasma TV sports screen, this place is very sixties. For example, dark, woody,

plush red booths. And always crowded. Word is, they serve more prime rib with au ius and horseradish than any eatery in San Diego. The "Petite Cut" 8 ounce, their smallest, fills you plenty, with its baked potato and salad. But just once, come here with your main squeeze and order up the "full cut for two." It hangs ten over the edges. Or go bonkers and order the 32-ounce cut — just to watch your neighbors' eyes bug out. Not flush? Try the "Bully Burger," French Dip sandwich, or calamari sandwich Lonely? Go to the horseshoe-shaped Low Bar. Lunch and dinner daily. The price ranges. — *E.B.* (2/03)

El Pollo Loco 2795 Main, Logan Heights, 619-595-0847. Additional lo-cations in College Area, Midway, Carmel Mountain, Chula Vista, El Ca jon, Lemon Grove, National City, Poway, and more. This Mexican-style chicken chain offers healthier, tastier fast food. The flame-broiled poultry has crisp, richly seasoned, very salty skin; the flesh can vary from barely done to overdone, but usually is just right. The bird (or any assortment of its parts) comes with sage gravy, tortillas, and a choice of side dishes that includes rich, sweet black beans, crisp and clean coleslaw, great gooey-cheesy macaroni, and passable mashed potatoes. Help yourself to salsas (there are four vari-eties), chopped onions, lemons, cilantro, hot peppers. But stick with the chicks - the taqueria-style choices are barely better than Taco Bell. Check for daily specials, wherein a small amount of cash will buy a huge amount of highly palatable poultry. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — N.W. (2/03)



This is the one major national chain to cling firmly to a regional American identity: Wherever you go, if you find a Popeye's, you'll be eating Louisiana flavors. But some flavors travel better than others in fastfood translations: The spicy, crisp fried chicken and air-light drop biscuits are fine as can be. The étouffé (whether of chicken or crawfish, when available) is surprisingly decent. The gumbo, offered at some locations, is weird - flavors aren't bad, but it's more like a Creole risotto, with wet rice instead of liquid (where's the soup?). Dirty rice and jambalaya are nasty and dry. Food quality varies subtly from branch to branch, as does the attitude of the counter-persons. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. — N.W. (2/02)

Uno Chicago Bar and Grill The 1943-born Uno chain made its mark by transforming the flat Italian pizza into something a little more upstanding. Deep-dish pizzas have become one of Chicago's better-known exports. Now Uno does serious steak too, with variously sized Angus top sirloins. They come pretty much as is, but the meat itself is plenty flavorful and tender. Its expanded menu includes fajitas, ribs, shrimp scampi, and steak'n cheese burgers. Still, most lunchtime customers we saw seemed to stick to the staple: deep-dish pizzas and salads. Open daily, continuous service, lunch and dinner. Akeelah and the Bee — An elevenyear-old black girl (the appealing Keke Palmer) in the South L.A. ghetto braves the taunts of "freak" and "brainiac" to enter the Scripps National Spelling Bee and, on her first try, go clear through to the tele-vised finals in Washington, D.C., where it all comes down to "logorrhea" and "pulchritude," two words to make even an average speller feel like a champ. In short, it's the documentary Spellbound with a fictional stacked deck, a palatable if not exactly swallowable family film, the sort of thing Oprah could get behind a hundred percent. Laurence Fishburne is the moody private tutor and Angela Bassett the distracted single mom: Ike and Tina Turner together again! Written and directed by Doug Atchison. 2006.

American Dreamz — Paul Weitz's satire of a television talent contest, starring Hugh

Ask the Dust — Depression-period romance, written and directed by Robert Towne, in a largely dark, nocturnal, unsunny Southern California, a star-crossed affair between a gringo and a Chicana, or more disparagingly a "dago" and a "spic," an impoverished young novelist taken under the wing, at long distance, of H.L. Mencken (whose voice in correspondence is provided by film critic and historian Richard Schickel) and a consumptive diner waitress from south of the border, two marginals with a tenuous sense of belonging. (The source material is a 1939 autobiographical novel by John Fante.) Because it is no sort of thriller, it avoids the plotting snarls and snags of Towne's screenplays for things like *Chinatown, The Two Jakes*, and the two *Mission: Impossible's*, but it does not avoid the structural weaknesses of slow, shapeless, and exasperating development. And notwithstanding the compatible blackness of their hair, Colin Farrell and Salma Hayek do not have a great deal of chemistry between them, although the combustible Hayek all by herself has enough chemistry for them both. Basic Instinct 2 — Sharon Stone, pushing fifty, takes her femme fatale act to London, along with her sandblasted face and helium-inflated boobs. There is an exculpatory spirit of self-parody in it, but then there already was, in the 1992 predecessor. The thing about any sort of parody, self- or otherwise, is that it can only be good for a short while. If it was ever any good in the first place. And Stone's bisexual Bacallspeaking serial-killing best-selling suspense novelist was always pretty awful. The most that a new director (Michael Caton-Jones) can do is to keep her off screen for lengthy stretches. A ramrod-straight psychoanalyst (and lower-tier actor, David Morrissey) will be easily wrapped around her pinkie. A slouching moviegoer might be harder to reach. Brick — Affected debut film from Rian Johnson, writer and director, a test-tube species of teen *noir*, a hard-boiled highschool hybrid, featuring a junior detective, a *fille fatale*, a small-time Mr. Big, and a brawny henchboy. Opaquely plotted, arcanely scripted, darkly photographed, and reverberantly recorded, incomprehensible on several levels. With Joseph Gordon-Levitt, Lukas Haas, Nora Zehetner. 2006. • (KEN, THROUGH 4/27)

Date Movie — In the mode of *Scary Movie*, a witless collection of references to, thefts from, and spoofs of, assorted romantic comedies, nonromantic comedies, noncomedies, anything at all, *My Big Fat Greek Wedding* to *Lord of the Rings*. The assumption seems to be that mere recognition will bring forth laughter. With Alyson Hannigan, Adam Campbell, Jennifer Coolidge, Fred Willard, Tony Cox, and Eddie Griffin; directed by Aaron Seltzer. 2006. • (VOGUE)

Failure to Launch — This romanticcomic bauble by Tom Dey has a definite situation, namely a mid-thirties stud still living at home with his parents. If the situa-

tion were born of any necessity - financial, psychological, medical, or otherwise the film might additionally have had a subject. But since the situation is only an amorous stratagem, an ace-in-the-hole shameful secret useful for scaring off overserious girlfriends, the film is left with no more than a formula: the burdened parents hire a "professional interventionist" (new synonym for paid escort) to woo their son away from the nest, the wooer soon starts to fall for him in earnest, he sees through the ruse and cuts himself off from both wooer and parents (good question: "Why didn't you just say something? All you had to do was tell me"), and everyone reconciles in the end. More simply, the whole thing is just a piece of exercise equipment for a couple of A-list hardbodies named Matthew McConaughey and Sarah Jessica Parker, the latter of whom could be said to be miscast as a character forever claiming and demonstrating a hearty appetite. Zooey Deschanel, as the sardonic roommate (what lately would have been known as the Joan Cusack character) driven half-mad by a persistent mockingbird, protects herself and her "indie" reputation — behind her idiosyncratic delivery of lines, half-depressive and half-drugged. (If you're not having a good time, well, neither is she.) And Terry Bradshaw, the former football star and current buffoonish football analyst, reveals the desperation of the enterprise by revealing his heinie. Friends with Money — There are, to be exact, three friends with money, and one without, a former teacher toiling now as a free-lance maid, helping herself to the bedside vibrator of one of her employers, and in her spare time harassing an ex-boyfriend with all-hours phone calls and hang-ups. The three with money additionally have mates. One of them, Catherine Keener, is collaborating with her husband on a screenplay, while adding an unsightly ocean-view second story on their home. Another, Frances McDormand, is a successful clothes designer with one child, plus a peculiar aversion to washing her hair, a reservoir of repressed anger, and a Britishaccented husband, a bath-products manufacturer, whom everyone but his wife recognizes as a closet homosexual ("Just because you care about what you wear doesn't mean to say you're gay"). The third, Joan Cusack, has a passel of kids, plenty of hired help with them, no job and no need of one, enough money to donate a spare couple of million to her children's school. Assuming the role of matchmaker, she introduces the moneyless and mateless friend, Jennifer Aniston, to her personal trainer, who begins to tag along with her on her housecleaning jobs and to demand a cut for haphazardly pitching in. Writer and direc-tor Nicole Holofcener, of *Walking and* Talking and Lovely and Amazing, is very adept at finding and pointing out the faults in all these people (no one is exempt), and the entire movie has an air about it of catty girl talk, very concrete and specific and vet ultimately insubstantial and desultory: a litany of everyday outrages (people who cut

in line at the cash register or steal parking spaces in the lot), a few useful tips for budget living (free cosmetics samples at the department stores), and of course some gripes about men (the cold-fish husband who won't be drawn into an argument, the blind date who can't tear his eyes from an old flame at the far end of the restaurant). Keener and McDormand are in another acting league, a tougher one, from Cusack and Aniston, but the facileness of the latter pair is not the sort of fault that the filmmaker is adept at pointing out. She is adept at minimizing it. 2006.

But because the director (Alexandre Aja) is French in origin, besides being the offspring of a film director and a film critic, perhaps it's also an *hommage*. Perhaps, too, there's something of significance to be read into the breed of deformed yahoos spawned by U.S. nuclear tests in New Mexico, the crater of abandoned autos, the ghost town of mannequins (-Surrealism for Dummies), and the transformations of a gun-toting Republican into a toasted marshmallow. Or perhaps not. Perhaps the mind yearns to wander.

"The lucky ones," the ad misinforms us, "die first." Not really. The lucky ones stay home. With Aaron Stanford, Vinessa Shaw, Kathleen Quinlan, Ted Levine, Robert Joy. 2006.


Ice Age: The Meltdown — More

straightforwardly, Ice Age: The Sequel. Our three inseparable prehistoric mammals woolly mammoth, sloth, and saber-toothed tiger — face global warming (as they are already calling it) and the impending inundation of their frozen valley. Even if they can escape the flood, outrun the rapacious sea beasts, and catch the prototype of Noah's Ark, the end is still near. And at the end of a sequel, even with a final retreat into Major Denial, the end can only be nearer. The consciousness of imminent doomsday is compounded — is complemented — by the personal identity crisis, the extinction anxiety, of the sore-thumb mammoth: "What if I *am* the last mammoth?" On the trek, he will get an answer to his question when he runs into an opposite-sex mammoth who, raised among possums, acts and thinks like a possum herself, another sort of identity crisis. All this existential angst gives the film more resonance than some other computer cartoons, an ominous low hum drowned out nonetheless by the au courant smart-ass brassiness. The nonverbal squirrel, wrestling with his own existential angst, chasing the unattainable acorn, continues to put in intermittent appearances but ceases to steal the show. Inside Man — Unabashedly commercial enterprise from Spike Lee, a lightweight heist-and-hostage caper with a heavyweight cast: Clive Owen as the bank-job mastermind, Denzel Washington as the New York cop who catches the call, Jodie Foster as the smugly enigmatic free-lance troubleshooter with friends in high places ("My bite's much worse than my bark"), and Christopher Plummer as the philanthropic money-

bags, plus a couple of poised middleweights, Chiwetel Ejiofor and Willem Dafoe as role players on the police team. The script by Russell Gewirtz (his first to reach the screen) is thick with intrigue: the robbers seem in no hurry to gather their loot and make their getaway, and the Chairman of the Board at Manhattan Trust is concerned to safeguard nothing but his own safety-deposit box. Having stirred up a slight bit of interest, however, the script neglects to answer key questions (how does Owen know what he knows? how did Foster get where she's got?), and it cuts some corners ("You saw Dog Day Afternoon," the top cop unwisely raises a close point of comparison), and it uses every ounce of its cleverness simply to avoid difficult choices. Lee, too, appears anxious to stay out of trouble. He tosses off a parody of violent video games (Kill Dat Nigra), and shows

some sensitivity to racial profiling (post-9/11, in particular), but his primary target has been selected for unanimity: Nazis and their collaborators. His direction of the essentially static action is ostentatiously busy. And yes, he remembers to roll out his trademark dolly at one point to give a lift to the riled hero: hell, literally, on wheels. 2006.

Lucky Number Slevin — "We are dealing with a bona fide case of mistaken identity here." No, we are dealing with a bogus case of fakeout — a crime story with an apparent innocent (Josh Hartnett) caught in the machinations of two rival gangs, African-American and Jewish, or "Darkies" and "Skullcaps" in copspeak, headed respectively by the Boss (Morgan Freeman) and the Rabbi (Sir — his official screen credit — Ben Kingsley), in addition to an out-of-town hit man (Bruce Willis) who plays both sides of the street. It features a staggering body count, a tediously doubling-back narrative, an offputtingly facetious tone, and a dense, heavy, claustrophobic décor. Mykelti Williamson, the shrimp man from *Forrest Gump*, earns a smile as a toothy dimwit named "Sloe," but that's early in the proceedings, before exasperation sets in. My Summer of Love — Director Pawel Pawlikowski, in faded color and with unstable camera, details the youthful indiscretions of two English girls of vastly different backgrounds, a horse-riding, cello-playing aristocrat on suspension from school ("Apparently I'm a bad influence on people") and a freckle-faced commoner who, together with her born-again ex-con brother, runs a Yorkshire pub having the same name as the cellist's practice piece: The Swan. The one introduces the other to Nietzsche, Edith Piaf, magic mushrooms, and the love that dare not speak its name (except after ingestion of magic mushrooms). Despite intimations of a drastic and dramatic turn of events ("In France, crimes of passion are forgiven" and "If you leave me, I'll kill you" and the like), the plot settles for the gentle curve of sadder-butwiser. Or from the moviegoer's point of view, sadder possibly, but none the wiser. Nathalie Press, a Sarah Polley type, corners the acting highlights, mimicking the sexual gyrations of her latest boyfriend and imitating Mercedes McCambridge's devil-possession dubbing from The Exorcist. Neil Young: Heart of Gold — Director, or on this occasion documentarist, Jonathan Demme fumbles through ten minutes of perfunctory interviews with the headliner and his fellow musicians, wretchedly shot in the interiors of cars and elevators, before settling down for nearly an hour and a half of well-recorded concert footage at the Ryman in Nashville. Reflective of the recent loss of his father and his own brush with a brain aneurysm, it is a mostly mellow set, even a melancholy one, a conspectus of new Young and old Young, with the now jowly, scowly singer squeezing out that effortful, painful, soulful voice from beneath a classic Good Guy's white cowboy hat. (Which changes to a tan hat, still that of a Good Guy, midway through: the film was shot over two nights.) His accompaniment encompasses, in varying combinations, bass guitar, dobro, keyboard, percussion, horns, strings, and backup singers. One of these last, Emmylou Harris, joins him on two duets, of which "This Old Guitar," a song about and performed on an instrument handed down from Hank Williams, is some sort of high point. "When God Made Me," a soft-sell, Socratic appeal for tolerance, with the singer at the keyboard for the only time and a silhouetted chorus behind him, tops it. Young, to be sure, is amply documented on film, notably in Jim Jarmusch's Year of the Horse from the late Nineties and his self-directed Rust Never Sleeps and Journey through the Past from the Seventies. The rabid will need no urging to see the latest addition. The more tepid might require assurance that if they were to limit themselves to just one, this should be it. The Notorious Bettie Page — Unworthy biopic on "the pin-up queen of the universe," a brief reign in the mid-Fifties, until a congressional hearing on pornography sent her down the path of repentance, into the sheltering arms of Jesus. Gretchen Mol is game enough in the posing sessions, and has her own kind of vulnerability in the role of the naïve and unreflective (so portrayed, anyway) Southern-bred sex object. Yet, besides missing something in the hips, replacing the dangerous curves with the gentlest of slopes, she cannot hope to match the charisma, the mystique, the mystery, of her assigned character. (It's no problem to match the raven hair and

bangs.) She finds herself in much the same predicament as past impersonators of Marilyn Monroe or Elvis Presley — and no, it is no overstatement to place Bettie Page, sometimes Betty Page, in that company. (Icons of the Fifties.) This mischievous, mute phantom of salacious still photos and silent fetish films is a fantasy figure par excellence; and filmmaker Mary Harron's stiff, flat, plodding rehearsal of some of the known facts of her life — a molesting father, a battering husband, the private camera clubs of New York City, the under-thecounter bondage sideline of the podgy Irving Klaw, the cheerful cheesecake of Bunny Yeager, the reversion to That Old-Time Religion — adds nothing to, even subtracts something from, the enigmatic evidence in her portfolio. It almost makes her seem (what would have been thought impossible) quite dull. Even the black-andwhite photography, or rather the gray-andgrayer photography, seems dull. (Backed up by a "dirty" saxophone, it might not immediately seem so in the opening prowl of a Times Square adult bookstore, past maga-zine titles like *Wink*, *Titter*, and *Escapade*.) As a diligent evocation of an era, it, too, is unworthy. The fitful switches into color a buoyant, brilliant, brighter-than-life color that pays knowledgeable homage to 1950s postcards and to Technicolor Hollywood — are anything but dull. One of the things they are, however, is utterly arbi-

On a Clear Day — Feel-goodery with a stiff upper lip. ("He's not going to achieve anything by it," sniffs the uncomprehending son when he finds out about it.) Peter Mullan has one of the great Common Man faces on the contemporary screen, blockish, pinched, intricately creased, and director Gaby Dellal fully appreciates it. The early depression, however, somehow carries more conviction than the later uplift. Brenda Blethyn, as the fretful wife who's in a secret training program of her own as a would-be city bus driver, appears to have had an expensive eye-widen-ing operation, but is otherwise as common as you please. 

Syriana - Serioso. Molto serioso. Not so much a drama as a diagram, didactic in purpose, of the chain-link interconnections, the slow-burn chain reactions, in the Middle Eastern oil trade. What screenwriter Stephen Gaghan did for the illicit drug business in Traffic, he attempts to do again, as both screenwriter and first-time director, for the even more intricate oil business. adopting some of the same "realistic" conventions (the unsteady camera, the intermittent subtitles, the egalitarian cast of characters, a lack of dramatic emphasis, an absence of heroics), and following the same pattern of crosscutting between plotlines in an apparently deliberate strategy of suspensus interruptus. Limpidity is not his aim. Complexity is, and no matter if the cost is confusion and incomprehension. You really need a scorecard to tell all the players. and even once you have figured out who's who, it's still hard to know which one, or ones, to root for; which outcome would be for the best; which course of action, if any, would clean up the mess. In the end, Gaghan convinces us he knows a lot more about how the world works than about how fiction works. 
Take the Lead — Inspirational pablum, "inspired," to begin with, "by a true story," that of Pierre Dulaine (played by that loverly Latin, Antonio Banderas), who vol-



unteers to bring his courtly Old World manners and his ballroom dance steps into Detention Hall at a rough New York high school: *Mad Hot Ballroom* meets *Blackboard Jungle*. The school principal (the formidable Alfre Woodard, who recedes from center stage too soon and too far) sees in the proposal "the cure for cutting class," a punishment so cruel and unusual as to scare the detainees straight. It's true that the sounds of Gershwin from a boom box drive them to plead for mercy, but nevertheless the Detention Hall roster remains as fixed throughout the school year as the roll of any English or History class. Thank You for Smoking — Satire with teeth, discolored though they may be. There is nothing exceptional cinematically about the directing debut of Jason Reitman, son of the mainstream comedy director Ivan Reitman (Ghostbusters, Twins, Kindergarten Cop, and the like), but from the opening credits — the witty cigarette-pack graphic motif, Tex Williams's C&W oldie, Smoke, Smoke, Smoke That Cigarette," in the background - his savvy adaptation of the Christopher Buckley novel does everything it set out to do. It delivers, in the phraseology of a cigarette ad, full rich flavor. Decidedly smoky, dry, sharp, acid, with a bitter aftertaste. It centers on a tobacco-industry lobbyist, the self-described "Colonel Sanders of Nicotine," a role that returns Aaron Eckhart to the friendly climate of his name-making film, In the Company of Men, where his hard-hearted charm, his machine-gun glibness, his immunity to self-doubt, can properly flourish. (The meaty face, the steely eyes, the sneering lips do not fit him for roles of sensitivity.) The surrounding cast is studded with true stalwarts, William H. Macy as the sanctimonious U.S. Senator from Vermont ("Where the Cheddar Is Better") who is pushing for a skull-and-crossbones warning on all cigarette packs; Robert Duvall as the industry's grand old man with his private jet, Tobacco One; J.K. Simmons as a conscienceless ves-man: and Sam Elliott as the cancer-ridden original Marlboro Man. (Maria Bello, Katie Holmes, Rob Lowe, and Adam Brody are in there, too.) The plot angle of pitching Hollywood on the idea of making cigarettes sexy again seems a little unimaginative, or rather, unobservant. Hollywood, like France, like Spain, has remained one of the last bastions of resistance against the anti-smoking movement, defiantly puffing away on screen, defending to the death the right of free choice. (There is pointedly no puffing on screen here: overprotection against charges of hypocrisy.) But this angle nonetheless leads profitably to the inner sanctum of Entertainment Global Offices (EGO), the orientalist lair of a Michael Ovitz-type superagent: "Jeff invented product placement." Further plot mechanics, although no more ingenious, never get to be a grind. At a brisk hour and a half, the film can be safely recommended to all who like their comedy unfiltered. 2006

Estrada - Tommy Lee Jones directs himself in a slight variation on the last act of Lonesome Dove, once more hauling the carcass of a close friend on horseback to his chosen resting place. This time he has the unwilling help of the friend's killer, a carpetbagging Border Patrolman from Cincinnati, who is made as unsympathetic as possible, brutalizing Mexican illegals, reading Hustler on the job, forcing himself on his wife from behind when she's trying to fix dinner and watch her favorite soap. The story is told nonsequentially and a touch incoherently, but Jones has a knowing eye for Tex-Mex squalor and ugliness, and he sniffs out some pungent gruesome details: e.g., setting the corpse's head on fire to beat back an attack of ants. With Barry Pepper, Julio Cedillo, Dwight Yoakam, January Jones, Melissa Leo. 2005. ★ (GASLAMP 15)

Tsotsi — From South Africa, the Oscarwinner for Best Foreign Film, 2005. That the simultaneous Oscar for the best nonforeign film went to Crash tells you pretty much all you need to know about the legitimacy of that honor. Writer and director Gavin Hood, adapting a novel by Athol Fugard, demonstrates conclusively that a film from South Africa can be as flashy and fashion-conscious as a film from anyplace else. He makes an effort, in addition, to supply a reason, a "motivation," for why a vicious cold-blooded punk who has hijacked a car with a baby in the back seat would decide to keep the baby and person ally care for him. The reason, nothing to do with thoughts of ransom, is unpersuasive. And objections will not be swept away under the onslaught of pathetic details: diapering the baby in newspaper, brushing ants from his face on the first morning, carrying him around in a shopping bag, soliciting parenting lessons at gunpoint from a beautiful young mother in the neighborhood. The depiction of a segregated shantytown, for all its music-video glossiness, does provide something of what we want from a foreign film, a window on the world. If the very same scenario, however, were transplanted to Atlanta or Detroit, and if it had no subtitles for an air of rarefaction, the film might have been more easily dismissed as contrived, manipulative, maudlin. V for Vendetta — Comic-book adaptation, or "graphic-novel" adaptation, about an avenging superhero hidden behind the stiff grin of a Guy Fawkes mask: a kind of Frankensteinian composite pieced together of Zorro (the black hat and cape, the revolutionary politics, the carving of his initial on his handiwork), Blade (the adeptness with cutlery, the customized arsenal thereof), the Phantom of the Opera (the disfigurement by fire, the romantic longing, the underground lair), among others. Batman, Darkman, whateverman. But it's his superhuman powers, much more than his plagiarisms, that make him into a bore: a martial-arts magician, an invincible oneman-army, a rebel without a care. The Australian actor Hugo Weaving is the sonorous voice, and presumably the body, behind the disguise. And Natalie Portman, with a faint and fugitive British accent, and a politicalprisoner haircut that martyrs her in the image of a Tibetan monk, is the tomato of his eye. The setting is indeed England, at a time in the near future when America, undermined by an unspecified war (illustrative news clips from the Middle East), has been reduced to "the world's biggest leper colony." England isn't much better, your standard totalitarian dystopia by way of Orwell, hard on minorities and nonconformists, explicitly homosexuals of both sexes, one of whom harbors a clandestine copy of the Koran. (For aesthetic reasons only, like one of the Book People in Fahrenheit 451.) The television voice of the regime, meantime, is a Bill O'Reilly blowhard, and its official head (John Hurt, promoted from his spot as the downtrodden hero in the 1984 treatment of 1984) is a Hitlerian ranter and raver. The only thing the least bit out of the ordinary in all of this is the closeness of the correlation to the present day, the strictness of the equivalence, the bluntness of the political comment, the harness on the imagination. One might guess that the filmmakers - firsttime director and veteran ad man James

La selección mexicana de futbol triplicó su potencial económico en los últimos cuatro años y los 26 jugadores convocados al Mundial de Alemania 2006 alcanzan hoy un valor de 76 millones de dólares.

El valor aproximado de las fichas de los 26 seleccionados mexicanos representan 2.65 veces el valor de 26 millones 800 mil dólares de dólares en los que estaban considerada la selección mexicana antes del Mundial Corea-Japón 2002.

El defensa Rafael Márquez (Barcelona) recibió la consideración más alta con 12 millones de dólares y el defensor Claudio Suárez (Chivas USA), la más baja con medio millón. En la selección mexicana de 2002, Rafael Márquez, entonces con el Mónaco de Francia, también fue considerado el jugador de más alto precio de la selección mexicana con ocho millones de dólares, de acuerdo con la información.

El delantero Francisco Fonseca (Cruz Azul) es el segundo jugador mejor cotizado con seis millones de dólares, delante del delantero Omar Bravo (Guadalajara) con cinco millones de dólares y los defensas Carlos Salcido (Guadalajara), Ricardo Osorio (Cruz Azul) con cuatro millones cada uno.

Cuando Pedro López Vázquez cruzó ilegalmente la frontera a mediados de abril, no entró en Estados Unidos con el propósito de buscar trabajo. Ya tenía uno asegurado.

"Íbamos a Colorado a trabajar en la carpintería porque ya tenemos un amigo que nos iba a dar trabajo", dijo Vázquez.

El mexicano de 41 años fue entrevistado en la frontera de Arizona después de haber sido deportado dos veces por la Patrulla Fronteriza de Estados Unidos. Dijo que seguiría intentando llegar a Aspen.

Su historia no es inusual. Un número creciente de empleadores estadounidenses e inmigrantes están apelando a una red de empleo clandestina que vincula a unos con los otros, a menudo antes de que los extranjeros salgan de sus países.

"Sigue estando bien en claro quién controla la inmigración: no son los gobiernos, sino más bien el mercado", comentó Jorge Santibáñez, director del Colegio de la Frontera Norte, un grupo de estudios con sede en Tijuana.

 Researchers at Massachusetts Institute of Technology are working on a high-tech device with seemingly a multitude of uses in lessening our crushing overload of banality: a boredom detector. A talker, via a wearable camera and software that measures facial expressions and movements, could know whether he has lost touch with a listener (via signals from eyebrows, lips, nose, etc.). The device was designed for the autistic (who are typically oblivious of other people's reactions), but would be useful to anyone underskilled at being interesting. So far, the software is said to be accurate 64 percent of the time, according to a March report in New Scientist.

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

- Bold Marketing: (1) Among men's colognes recently launched: the Elizabeth Arden-NASCAR "Daytona 500" fragrance and the Ecuadorean Football Federation's set of three soccer-motif scents, ranging from a "sporting" aroma to "an intense smell ideal for after work." (2) Butte, Mont., has long been unhappy with the presence of the Berkeley Pit, a huge, putrid, toxic lake filled by runoff from arsenic, copper, cadmium, cobalt, iron, and zinc mines. Last year, however, the town began to figure out that tourists would actually pay to see the 500-acre, 900-foot-deep, foul, wretched mess. Attendance was so good that the admission price was recently increased. - Specialty Products: The apparently successful Iraq Insurance Co. (a state-owned firm with 50 salespeople nationwide) is thought to be the only company in the world to offer "off-theshelf" terrorism life insurance (paying a bodyguard's beneficiary, for example, the equivalent of about \$3500, which is a policeman's yearly salary, for a \$90 premium, according to a New York Times dispatch). As of mid-March, no policyholder had been killed. (2) Among the "brand" names used by marijuana traffickers to sell dopelaced candy, according to federal agents who made arrests in March in Oakland, Calif., are Buddafingers, Pot Tarts, Double Puff Oreo, Puffa-Mint Pattie, and Toka-Cola.

- Volleyball is quite popular among female devout Muslim refugees in Kenya, according to a March New York Times dispatch, even though the women's bulky hijabs frequently shift around, hindering the "digs" and "spikes." The Nike company recently came to the rescue by designing (and then donating) sleek hijabs that cover the skin and hair appropriately, but also permit much freer movement on the court. Nike is silent on its marketing plans, but worldwide, the number of Muslim girls and women of prime sportsplaying age is huge.

Science on the Cutting Edge

In work by various labs in the United States, the Netherlands, and Australia (reported by Toronto's Globe and Mail in March), meat was grown in test tubes, and such dishes may yet be a staple in progressive kitchens. "Before bed, throw starter cells and a package of growth medium into the (coffee maker-sized) meat maker and wake up to harvest-fresh sausage for breakfast," wrote the Globe and Mail. Engineered meat would taste like beef or pork, but could be created to be as healthful as salmon. One private group told researchers it was interested in growing human meat, but funding for any of the work will be difficult, said a Medical University of South Carolina scientist.

 A family has been found in Kurdish Turkey whose members walk on all fours, use the palms of their hands for balance, and stand upright only with difficulty, according to researchers who filmed the family for a March British television show. According to Professor Nicholas Humphrey of the London School of Economics, scientists' best guess for the family's condition is that their inbreeding caused the reprise of genetic traits long thought to have been evolutionarily passed over.

Man's Best Friend (Except Sometimes)

- In February, two girls (aged 12 and 13) ran away from home in Cleveland, headed by bus for Minneapolis, along with Bambi, one girl's family dog (represented to the driver as a "guide dog"). However, the girls overfed Bambi on junk food, and the dog became so flatulent as to cause a commotion on the bus, which eventually drew police officers, who then discovered the girls were runaways.

Bright Ideas

- In February, the Missourian newspaper reported that Columbia resident Adam Ballard, 22, now in his second year in the Army, is overeating and under-exercising so as to gain weight rapidly and exceed the Army's body-fat requirement, which will force his discharge rather than his deployment to the Middle East war zone. According to The Columbian, 3285 soldiers were discharged for excess body fat in 2004 (although not all were war-zone shirkers). Ballard said he had no qualms because recruiters had originally assured him a desk job.

Least Competent Criminals

- Inexplicable: Phillip Williams, 47, for some reason approached two uniformed police officers in Tampa, Fla., in March to ask their opinions of whether the substance he had just purchased for the crack pipe he was holding was indeed cocaine. After examining the pipe, the officers suspended their then-current investigation of a burglary and put the cuffs on Williams. ... The month before, in Orlando, Michael Garibay, 34, approached a sheriff's deputy in a marked patrol car and asked him if he was "straight," which, as Garibay proceeded to explain to the befuddled officer, meant, "Do you want to buy cocaine?" After Garibay pulled out a baggie of white rocks, he was arrested.

- Recurring Themes: In March, Gary Brunner became the latest person to go to a police station and ask if there were any warrants on him, only to find the answer to be yes and that he was under arrest (for drug possession, Carmel, N.Y.). ... And Bryan Palmer, 21, and Peggy Casey, 31, were interviewed by police investigating a burglary in South Windsor, Conn., in March, but were released. Detectives changed their minds, though, and were futilely searching for them when the pair showed up at the police station to ask how the investigation was going.

The Sacred Institution of Marriage

 (1) In February in Pattaya, Thailand, the woman who was the former Guinness Book recordholder for living in a cage with scorpions was married to the man who holds the equivalent record for time spent with centipedes, with consummation immediately afterward in a coffin. (Kanchana Ketkaew had stayed 32 days with 3400 scorpions and Bunthawee Siengwong 28 days with 1000 centipedes.) (2) After Ms. Sohela Ansari told friends in their village in West Bengal state in India that her husband had mumbled "talaq, talaq, talaq" in his sleep, word got to local Muslim authorities, who declared the couple divorced. (A Muslim husband may obtain a divorce merely by the utterance, and the West Bengal clerics ruled that he need not be awake at the time.)

- In March, Deputy Fire Chief Leroy Johnson, 52, of Mesa, Ariz., announced his retirement after becoming possibly the highest-status person in the country in recent years to be allegedly witnessed having sex with a barnyard animal (a lamb). ... Another possible record-setter was Kimberly Du, 36, who was charged in February in Des Moines, Iowa, with faking her December death to avoid prosecution on several traffic tickets, which might be the pettiest criminal charge anyone has ever tried to avoid by faking death.



Tonight is melancholy, but I can't imagine why.

I am coming home from a party and I smell like secondhand smoke and, in the cool air, it's not so bad, an almost comforting smell. The moon is out and lights my way, and as I stoop to tie my shoe, I can hear the clink-clink of bottles hitting each other as a homeless woman scoops through the bags at the curb. I'm still a bit jazzed from hopping out of my shared cab mid-ride as my acquaintance/friend Colleen curled up by the wrought-iron fence of the Boston Common to vomit. It's cold in a way that picks up my step. I could run if I wasn't so tired. But I am, so I don't. I walk, keep walking, shoes scraping the asphalt.

I'm thinking about the future, I guess: where I'll be in two months, what shape my life will take. There is so much to do, and it feels impossible. Time is beginning to slip through my fingers. It's cruel, how slow it went at first, when I wanted it to speed up, and how now, when I need it most, time has quickened. How much I gained this year and how much I lost, what I had and thought I had and never had and never will have and might get again but then again, might not. And what it all means and what it all doesn't. I kick a rock.

Without reason, I start to sing. I'm at the top of the hill on which I live, crossing it to get to my street. I don't know what I'm singing, but it matches my step, and it takes me two blocks to realize that it's "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot." A spiritual.

I was about six years old when I learned that song, sweet

I'm still singing, letting the song fill me up and tug me empty, the way I now know it will. I'm not a great singer but not a terrible one, still possessing a sweet voice but, if I'm honest with myself, one best suited for harmony,

for descant. It is not a leader's voice, but it is tonight, on this lonely street, in this lonely song. And it was when I sang out for the first woman I ever loved, the first time I opened my voice to another person. I sang for her as I sing now, though I lost my nerve there with her and dropped off after

three lines, the only lines I remembered. Here, I press on strong, verse for verse, singing for me, I guess. Singing to keep my head from bowing, to keep my eyes from filling? Singing to whom? To myself? To the moon?

But it doesn't matter. It doesn't matter, because tonight I'm looking over Jordan and begging whoever beats me to it to tell my friends I'm close behind.



he met an Asian male only known to him as Phil at Horton Plaza on Saturday, March 11, at approximately 11:00 a.m. Phil helped him with his camera and they became friends. T. parted ways with Phil that morning and met on the street at 300 Broadway at approximately 8:00 p.m. that night.

T. told me that Phil offered him alcohol. Phil stated the alcohol was in his car. T. went with Phil to his vehicle and drank three shots of tequila in a parking lot. Phil was drinking too. T. told me he did not know the location of the parking lot. T. watched Phil make the drinks that he had. Phil wanted to go to a strip club. T. agreed and Phil started to drive to the location. T. said he was coherent as Phil drove him around. T. said he entered into an unknown location in Mexico and blacked out. T. told me he may have been drugged.

T. woke up on Saturday afternoon at approximately 1:30 p.m. when the manager of the Mexican Hotel knocked on the door and told him to pay for another night or leave. T. said he has only blacked out one other time in his life due to drinking alcohol. T. noticed his clothes were off except for his boxer shorts and his shoes. He saw a condom on the floor in the room.

T. said he walked to the border entry that took him five minutes to reach after getting dressed. As he crossed the port of entry at approximately 5:00 p.m., T. was stopped by the Border Patrol and arrested for being drunk in public. The Military Police arrived and took custody of T. A call was made to his shop and [Military Police] arrived and picked T. up and drove him back to his ship.

T. said later on in the evening he started to feel discomfort...[he] decided to seek medical help at the Naval Hospital and admitted himself...prior to his ship sailing port.

the dreams are of a kind.

The line at the border is once again a matter of at least three hours on foot to approach customs. I have Protonix or some Mexican version of the antacid, some Levoxyl for my thyroid, and the wrong dose of Coreg for my heart. I have prescriptions for all of these; but the dosage, as with the Coreg, may be wrong, the quantity may or may not be legal (is it 30 days' supply? 60? 90?), and getting swift, sure answers from customs either in person or by phone can be an absurd runaround. Telephone information on the legality of what med one might like to bring over the border is in one way or another discouraging. That is the key word. Purchasing pharmaceuticals in Mexico and bringing them to the United States is effectively discouraged with Kafkaesque bureaucracy or Orwellian doublespeak.

Then there is the line. La linea. Much longer for autos, but it can easily involve a large part of a pedestrian's day. On more than one occasion when doing this (Lord, I try to avoid Fridays, but that is payday), I rented a hotel room for \$25 just off Revolución, where renting by the hour proves convenient for prostitution or "massage" clients, and now a side business provides middle-aged, beer-sodden gamblers from Caliente or med-hounds from the States a room to sleep away the heaviest and hottest part of the day when the line is longest. I could have paid a fraction of the \$25, I believe, except that I registered as a journalist, and my guess is they did not wish to advertise as a brothel.

At 4 p.m., sunlight jostling its way between stunted cumuli heading for Japan fills the room at the Adelita or El Rey Hotel rooms (right next door and interchangeable) with swards of dirty amber, like sienna tint on an old daguerreotype, lending the border desperation, the poverty, and implicit crime in the woodwork a certain historical quality. Stretched out on the surprisingly comfortable, very firm mattress (never remove the bedspread), I have dreamed in those rooms and

Revolución, the main drag, itself a kind of dragon entity in some eternal urban New Year's dance of the Worm Ouroboros. Whistles, sirens, waiters shaking the heads of your missing children like maracas as they pour tequila, Kahlua, mescal with the worm that makes you dream of flying 100 miles an hour exactly one inch off of the ground. Those dreams come later, nightmares are likely first. Faces come at you out of the night and indeed you are likely to hear the Lizard King singing that exact Peso Opera piece from subsonic weapons-grade sound systems. But this is not Berlin, wall or no wall, it is Tijuana Through your open window, set high, as if in the cinder block of a cell

wall, curdled blue/gray smoke writhes inside. Shot through the charred carnitas fumes like lightning is the staccato stuttering detonation of distant disco balls. The trustee is outside now, banging at your cell wall and asking if you want anything to read; but the cart is filled only with implements for cleaning. The second floor is tiered like a cell block, as is the third and fourth. You are back in jail. The charge this time was? It will come back in a moment, or you may never know what you have done. The trustee tosses you a rolled magazine called Black Flag and you see that it is really insecticide, the stuff you asked for at the desk, along with a remote control for the tube, with which you will kill the stately circling flies doing a mindless pavane in the middle of vour cell.

Momentarily you wake and realize you have been dreaming. What were you thinking? You will not gas yourself with this stuff to kill the slow dogfight of flies in the gone-amber/now neon-stained pool of margarine moonlight. You had just been reading the Dalai Lama, and you remembered his advice on getting rid of flies, and so you do it. You turn off all the lights except the television and the light in the bathroom. You open the bathroom window. One by one you watch the flies desert their aerial ballet and flee to the bathroom, discover the open window, and seek out the abyss of blue-black freedom beyond. The master was right. All of them are gone, bloodlessly, within minutes.

Times have changed. Years ago you spent hours in rooms like this in Mexico, snapping flies out of the air with rubber bands, crippling them, watching them die against the floorboards. You listen to the quiet you have created; Revolución barking and crumping like a battle down the street. The Silence of the Flies, you think, and congratulate yourself on your spiritual growth even if measurable only in this way.

The television Spanish lulls you to sleep. It is Friday night and the line will still be impossible. You will wait for that window between midnight and the last trolley out of San Ysidro at two a.m.

It is a movie in English that comes on during your own rapid-eye-movement late show. The Animal Factory, a prison film directed by Steve Buscemi. A guard stands at the bars to your cell; you seem to know him, and he's a character actor. "They think you're smoking drogas in here," he says


'It is pipe tobacco. Virginia Burley with Turkish latakia and perique. Maybe it smells like drugs."

"Of course. You are innocent." A cachinnation like a burst of automatic rifle fire echoes up and down cell block two. It is laughter. The Laughter of the Innocents.

'You're smuggling drugs. Personally, I don't care."



"Which way to the donkey show?"

"Blood pressure, Lotensin, Lipitor, cholesterol." You recite them all: drugs you have been prescribed, taken off of, re-prescribed. "Lexapro, an antidepressant." The police have been called. How much money do you have?

You want me to hire a girl? Then I will be all right?

'You have certain anti-anxiety drugs. The municipales will want you to give them some money. You have money?

I see now that it is William H. Macy, but it was another actor a moment ago. Behind him is Mickey Rourke in drag, pointing a gun at me.

I get up, push past the guard, now dissolving in an anti-anxiety-cloaking haze into another actor. He calls after me as I leap down the stairwell, two steps at a time. "Scarface! Scarface!" He's laughing his ass off, and it's a real guy. Pipe smoke is billowing from my room, and three Mexican men, associated in various ways with the hotel, are laughing with him. Rourke pulls the trigger and the 9mm shot is echoed by thunder over the Tijuana River levee.

'Key and remote are on the bed. Lo siento. Mi español....

The rain wakes me in the pedestrian line. I stare up at the huge television advertisement screens and realize that I am as awake as Lorazepam will allow and that I have all along been on the set for the film Bladerunner. Surely Ridley Scott meant Tijuana and not Los Angeles or wherever that was supposed to be.

At customs, Harrison Ford asks what I brought with me from Mexico. "Prescription drugs. I have San Diego and Tijuana prescriptions for them."

He removes the Protonix, says, "Too many." Confiscated. "How much have you had to drink?'

'None. Nothing. Do I appear drunk?"

- "It's just the hour. Didn't want a margarita, some shooters?"
- "Want them? Ah, no. No. Didn't have to."
- "Yeah, gets pretty crazy, I know what you mean."

It took me some miles along the trolley to understand, unlike Harrison Ford, who seemed to know immediately what it was that I had meant when I said, "I didn't have to.

Pulling out my cell phone and dialing my roommate, I announce, "I'm home, son. Feels good."


