

Politics of inflation The fortunes of San Diego city taxpayers may be in free fall as city hall awaits long-delayed audits and possible indictments of city officials in the great retirement-fund scandal, but city-council staffers aren't feeling the pinch. Beset from all sides over the way they've mismanaged city finances, councilmembers have managed to take care of their own with generous salaries and benefits in most cases far higher than what they made only a half-decade ago, according to documents recently obtained from the city under the state public records act.

Highest-paid staffer at \$101,982 is Ana Molina-Rodriguez, who now works for Eighth District councilman Ben Hueso. She held the same spot in



the office of Hueso's predecessor, Ralph Inzunza - convicted in the Cheetahs stripclub bribery scandal - and testified briefly at his trial last summer. Molina-Rodriguez is the only one of the eight chiefs of staff who is actually making a bit less than her predecessor. In

Rodriguez April 2001, the Union-Tribune

reported that Inzunza was paying then-chief of staff Lawrence Cohen \$105,379.

Next in line at the taxpayer-fed trough is Aimee Faucett, who receives \$99,008 working for the Seventh District's Jim Madaffer. That represents a comfortable increase from the \$74,212 she report-



her city hall duties, Faucett also managed her boss's reelection campaign. Fifth District chief of staff Lance Witmondt, who works for Brian Maienschein and ran his campaign back in 2000, makes \$91,208, way up from the \$66,527 he was paid

back in 2001 when he was report-

edly the lowest-compensated chief of staff. Next comes Steve McNally, employed by Sec-

ond District councilman Kevin Faulconer. McNally, who once "owned and operated a manufacturing and distribution company that specialized in radio

and wireless test equipment," according to the councilman's website, is paid \$89,502. Five years ago, then-incumbent Byron Wear paid \$69,330 to chief of staff Kav Carter.

Then there is Jimmy Slack, who makes \$87,559 in the Fourth District offices of Tony Young. In 2001, George Stevens

paid \$73,701 to his chief of staff, Charles Lewis, who later succeeded Stevens. (Lewis died in August 2004 and was indicted in the Cheetahs case in August 2003.) The First District's Scott Peters pays Betsy Brennan Kinsley \$84,510. She once worked as a "Legislative Clerk for the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Commerce in Washington, D.C.," according to the councilman's website. Five years ago, Peters chief of staff Chris **Cameron** got \$75,692.

In the District Three office of councilwoman Toni Atkins, Denise Price is paid \$82,992. She boasts of having once handled "community and media relations for elected officials, including Speaker Emeritus Antonio Villaraigosa, Assemblymember Mike Gotch, and San Diego city councilmember Valerie Stallings," according to the Atkins website. In 2001, Atkins paid then-chief of staff Jeff Gattas \$69,614.

Bringing up the rear in the salary derby is Sixth District chief of staff Steven Hadley, who makes \$82,397 as aide to onetime mayoral candidate Donna Frye. Five years ago, Frye's Sixth District seat stood vacant after the resignation of Valerie Stallings as part of a plea bargain she reached with the district attorney over her role in the John Moores influence-peddling scandal. But her chief of staff, Jane Potter, holding down the fort while awaiting a special election to fill the vacancy, still made \$73,680.


Airport in hiding While Union-Tribune editorial writers and the United States Marines gear up for a nasty electoral fight this fall over a Miramar airport, Leon Campbell has another idea. The La Jolla lawyer has long been peddling a "mystery site" for a new airport that would avoid all the negative traffic and noise impacts associated with the

Miramar site. But Campbell and his "Airport Trust" want big money for their trouble. "The compensation sought by the trust is an annual royalty of \$10 million or 5 percent of annual airport revenues, whichever is greater," wrote Campbell in a letter to Port of San Diego pres-

ident and CEO Bruce Hollingsworth on June 23. "The term of the royalty would be the same as the term of the copyright, 95 years." To put that in perspective, Campbell adds, "The annual royalty is about two-thirds the annual salary of one of the players for the San Diego Padres. The top four executives of Qual-



comm earn an average annual salary of \$29 million. None of these persons generate over \$4 billion annually for the region which the new airport will add to the region's economy." Port commissioners were interested enough in the proposition that

Bruce Hollingsworth they invited Campbell to a June 20 retreat, according to a memo

from Hollingsworth to the board, but wouldn't agree to keep the location confidential, as demanded by Campbell in return for letting them in on the secret. That rebuff, according to Campbell, was repeating a mistake of a past encounter Campbell had had with the Port. "When I met with Dennis Bouey and general counsel David Chapman seven years ago, Mr. Chapman recommended against a confidential disclosure agreement, which recommendation was followed," recalled Campbell. "This was a fateful decision. It is likely the Port District would still be operating the airport today and would be the operator of the new airport. I hope in this instance history will not repeat itself."



Gary Aguirre's Sacking Should Spur Probe

he federal Securities and Exchange Commission was established in 1934 with the mission to protect the public from Wall Street.

Today, it's the other way around, say critics. Now there may be a national debate on his brother Mike Aguirre, made a bundle practicing law here before going into government.

investigator for the Securities

and Exchange Commission, he had spent months probing a hedge fund. Among many questionable things, it had made money by investing in a company shortly before it was taken over at a fat premium. Aguirre came to suspect that the fund had been tipped off to the pending deal by John Mack, now head of one of Wall Street's biggest firms, Morgan Stanley. Mack, whose name has been bandied about as a possible political appointee, is a major fund-raiser for President George W. Bush.

Gary Aguirre's supervisor initially backed him enthusiastically; he had just gotten excellent performance reviews. But senior officials of the agency nixed the investigation "because the suspected tipper had powerful political connections," Aguirre says he was told.

Shortly, Gary Aguirre was fired. Strike one. Then when he wanted to tell his story to Congress, the agency warned him that he would risk breaking the law because details of the investigation could not be made public. Strike two. "There is a federal statute in effect for more than 90 years that authorizes federal employees to provide information to the Congress," says Aguirre in an interview. Some politicontinued on page 8

Can't Blame Sin City

Paul Del Vacchio remembers the first time he gambled. "I was 12 years old," he says. "It was a \$2 bet to show on a horse at Pocono

Downs in Pennsylvania. I remember this weird feeling came over me when I was placing that bet at the window, and when I was watching the race, and when the horse actually crossed the finish line first and it won."

The feeling lay dormant inside Del Vacchio as he grew up in Carteret, New Jersey. It resurfaced when he was 16. "I was working in a grocery store," he recalls, "and the store manager, who was betting with a bookie, told me about a way to bet on NBA games. I bet \$25 each on five games and lost them all. I think that was a Thursday, and then on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday I won enough to actually be ahead for the week."

Those first four days of betting, losing, and chasing a gambler's term for trying to recoup losses with more gambling — turned out to be the pattern for the next 24 years of Del Vacchio's life. Only instead of ending up ahead, he ended up nearly a half-million down and on his way to prison for embezzling money from his employer, Pechanga Indian casino in Temecula.

Back at the grocery store in New Jersey, Del Vacchio and a friend teamed up and laid bets with his manager*cum*-bookie every day. "After a while my manager owed us \$500, but he wound up stiffing us. He owed a lot of people money, and he stiffed everybody. Eventually he got fired for absenteeism."

Instead of seeing his manager as an example of how gambling can destroy lives, Del Vacchio and his gambling partner found another bookie. "He was a bar bookie in the same town. He owned the bar, and he ran a decent-sized bookie operation out of it. Over the course of the next year or so, we ratcheted the bets up to \$500 or \$1000 a game. Then, in the summer between high school and college, we lost \$13,400 in one week."

Unlike legal sports books, which require a deposit in advance to cover bets, the bar bookie was taking bets on credit. And neither Del Vacchio nor his partner had anything like the cash they needed to pay their losses. "So I went to my dad," Del Vacchio says, "and confessed the whole thing. My dad talked to the bookie and told him, 'You are not going to be paid by these two kids. You should not be taking this kind of action from these two kids.' The bookie made a couple of approaches to me, asked me for a payment plan. I said, 'No, I don't want to do that.' He said, 'Are you sure?' and I knew he was trying to intimidate me. In the end, I didn't have to pay, and no knees or legs were broken, which is fortunate, because those bookies back East are usually connected to organized crime. I think what saved me from any bodily harm was that shortly thereafter he got busted by the police."

Alarmed by the amount of money their son had lost, Del Vacchio's parents sent him to see a psychologist. "I went once, and we talked about



everything but gambling," he recalls.

His father also arranged for someone from Gamblers Anonymous to call Del Vacchio. "He sounded like a Tony Soprano–type character," Del Vacchio remembers, "which I found pretty intimidating. He told me that I needed to get to a meeting and I needed to practice the principles in the Gamblers Anonymous program. He told me that I could never gamble again and that my addiction, my compulsive gambling, would never get better unless I addressed it. 'It will only get worse. You will end up in prison, insane, or dead if you don't address it."

When Del Vacchio thinks back on those words today, he labels them "prophecy." And they, combined with the scare of the \$13,400 loss, were enough to keep him away from gambling for his four years of college at the University of Southern California and the University of Maryland. "In college," he says, "there were odd bets here and there — no bookies, just guyto-guy."

But after graduating from Maryland in 1987, "Some friends and I took a drive up to Atlantic City. I won \$2000 playing blackjack, and it sparked something in my head and in my stomach. It was that same euphoric rush. It is a physical thing that I can feel. I am a runner, and it is akin to the runner's high, when those endorphins kick in."

Del Vacchio parlayed his accounting degree into a job in New York City. "Shortly after moving to New York," he recalls, "I hooked up with my old gambling buddy from Carteret, and he was connected to a new bookie in South Jersey. We figured out bling by using our credit cards bling by using our credit cards to bet. That way, the bookie

cians and other bureaucrats are upset with the treatment Gary Aguirre is getting.

"These ninnies at the SEC [Securities and Exchange Commission] — it's typical stupidity," says Gary Weiss, author of the hot-selling new book, *Wall Street Versus America.* "The SEC is set up to protect Wall Street. But you rarely see an instance when the SEC goes this far out of its way to stick its head in a guillotine to protect Wall Street. How blatant can you get?"

Others took up the cudgels for Gary Aguirre. The *New York Times* broke the story on its front page and has kept up the coverage. Gary Aguirre's ordeal could be "a scandal of gargantuan proportions," opined *CJR Daily*, a media watchdog connected with the *Columbia Journalism Review*.

Other media were not so kind. Gary Aguirre's allegations "seem flimsy, even if political factors did indeed spur his firing," commented *Barron*'s, the investment weekly.

Its sister publication, the *Wall Street Journal*, in a piece signed by no fewer than six reporters, went out of its way to note that Gary Aguirre is the brother of San Diego City Attorney Mike Aguirre, who has had a long-running battle with Christopher Cox, former Orange County congress member who is now head of the Securities and Exchange Commission. "As city attorney, Michael Aguirre has also been critical of the SEC in its continuing probe of accounting improprieties of the San Diego pension fund," said the *Journal*.

"Mike had nothing to do with this. I never discussed this with him," says Gary Aguirre, who intends to return to San Diego before long. "The *Wall Street Journal*'s suggestion is ridiculous. Mike and I do not share an anti-SEC gene."

"I haven't even spoken to Gary about this," says Mike Aguirre. The *Journal*'s story represented "guilt by association. They never contacted me to see if we had ever spoken. I didn't know about it until I read it in the newspaper. It is highly improper for them to do that without speaking to me; obviously it was some kind of a plant, some kind of spin to discredit what he was saying."

A spokesperson for the *Journal* says, "We weren't trying to draw any implications or inferences from the connection. It is simply a fact, and Michael Aguirre's spokeswoman confirmed it to our reporter."

Like his brother, Gary Aguirre has a law degree from the University of California, Berkeley's Boalt Hall. He came to San Diego in 1968 to work as a public defender. In 1971, while with a law firm, he handled a contentious trade-secret case. He opposed attorney Jim Eckmann. "He can be upsetting and aggressive, but he never lied to me, never lied in court," says Eckmann. In 1984, the onetime opponents formed a law firm to tackle construction defect legislation.

Initially, the firm was located in a run-down building at Eighth and C, one story below the firm run by Mike Aguirre. "They moved out many years before I moved out," says Mike Aguirre. "For a while I was the only tenant there — me and the rats."

The firm founded by Gary Aguirre and Jim Eckmann closed in 1995. Eckmann has been teaching in several universities since then. Gary Aguirre says he "went to film school, spent some time in Europe, sort of took the weekends I had never taken in 28 years of practicing law and took the next 5 years to do the things I had always hoped to do. Around 2001, I decided that I would like to do something in public service." He went to Georgetown Law Center for his LLM (master of laws) degree, specializing in securities. Then he joined the Securities and Exchange Commission, although he was in his 60s

He was investigating Pequot Capital Management, a hedge fund. When he sought permission to take the deposition of Mack, he was rebuffed and then fired. When he wanted to tell his story to Congress, he was warned that he could be in trouble. (Pequot and Morgan Stanley deny any wrongdoing.)

The Judiciary Committee is looking into hedge funds, which now have more than \$2 trillion in assets. These are sometimes called mutual funds for the superrich, although there are differences: a high percentage are based in offshore tax and secrecy havens, and they take huge risks with borrowed money, such as speculating in currencies, complex derivatives, and corporate takeovers. Initially, the idea was that they would hedge — that is, bet that some stocks will go up and others go down. Now, many don't hedge at all. They just gamble, and they charge their clients 20 percent or more of their profits, plus 2 percent of their assets under management.

Weiss devotes five chapters of his book to tearing up hedge funds, saying such things as "Hedge funds are glorified mutual funds with fees that are high enough to choke a Clydesdale, Belgian, Percheron or other draft horse." Also, he quotes figures from a prominent economist showing that hedge funds actually underperformed the overall market from 1995 to 2003. So why does so-called "smart money" invest in these things? I suspect there are hidden tax advantages from the offshore locations, and there's a whole lotta stashin' goin' on, but others say that's only a small factor.

In his testimony, Aguirre warned that hedge funds could become as dangerous as the unregulated pools of money (called syndicates, trusts, and pools) that manipulated stocks in the ultimately disastrous markets of the 1920s. He is concerned that big concentrations of loot parked in hedge funds will lead to another takeover wave like the one of the 1980s when good companies were raided and seized by crooks with shady sources of money. He would like to see hedge funds regulated, even though an appellate court late last month knocked down the securities commission's attempt to make hedge funds register with the agency.

Harrumphs Weiss, "The regulation of hedge funds is ridiculous. The SEC is not going to do anything. Hedgefund regulation has such gigantic loopholes you could drive the Northeast Corridor Amtrak trains through it."

As Gary Aguirre points out, influential forces make sure the agency has neither the funds nor the legal clout to do its job against the rich and powerful. There is another problem: for lawyers, a gig at the Securities and Exchange Commission is a steppingstone to high-paying Wall Street jobs. The staff attitude, says Weiss, is "You can't do that to John Mack. We might want to work for Morgan Stanley one of these days." It's time for a national dis-



would always be paid, and we wouldn't end up in the situation we were in as teenagers." But access to credit only allowed Del Vacchio to get into deeper financial trouble. He got married in 1992 without disclosing his mounting gambling debts to his wife. In 1994, when the couple decided to move to Las Vegas and buy a house, Del Vacchio told his wife he owed \$80,000 in gambling debt to credit card companies. He declared bankruptcy.

Ironically, Del Vacchio's moving to Las Vegas to work in the auditing department of a casino was the beginning of a four-year lull in his gambling. "I thought that if I worked for the casinos I could get that rush without actually having to gamble."

But in 1998, the year the first of his two children was born, Del Vacchio took a job at a new casino in the soonto-be-opened Summerlin resort, northwest of Las Vegas. "It was a great opportunity for me," he says. "The problem was, they didn't have much for me to do because the opening kept getting delayed, and all my work was predicated on the opening. So I needed to find something to do during the day, and I discovered that I could bet sports on the Internet. I found a place where I could put my credit card in. 'This is in total control,' I thought, because it wasn't like a bookie, where you would bet on credit. You would have to send the money there. If I send \$1000, I can't exceed the \$1000. I could only lose \$1000. Oh, how naïve I was. I found this one site, and I started continued on page 10

playing, and I actually won \$3000. But they wouldn't pay me. Come to find out that it was actually some kind of scam site. They were just taking credit card numbers. So I took it as a personal mission to hunt these people down and get my money. I found the guy; he was in Fort Lauderdale. I basically harassed him, and he gave me 50 cents on the dollar — he gave me \$1500. So from that point forward, I thought, 'Okay, I have to do this right. I have to go to sites that are going to pay me. Because I know how to control my gambling now, and I know how to win. So I can augment my income by doing this.' "

Soon, Del Vacchio says, the gambling "became something I *had* to do. This is the hardest thing to explain to people, but if four o'clock went by without me having a bet — because most of the games started at four o'clock — I would have this weird feeling in my stomach, my palms would sweat, and my heart would beat faster. It was like I needed to get my drug for that day."

In July 2001, Del Vacchio was about \$50,000 in the hole when he took a job at Pechanga Casino and moved his family to a house in Murrieta. "It was a great job," he says. "I was going in as assistant controller at one of the most profitable casinos in the world, let alone the United States. It was a big pay raise. I went up to, like, \$80,000. We loved the area, a great family area. We bought a house in Murrieta. Life was looking good, but I was still betting."

Del Vacchio covered his gambling losses with the equity in his house, which, at that time, was multiplying almost as fast as he could bet it away. Then in 2003, he discovered something in the Pechanga accounting system. "I wasn't looking for it," he insists, "but I found out that I could transfer money from Pechanga's reserve account into my personal bank account, and no one would know because there were no controls in place and nobody else was capable of understanding how it worked. The first time, it happened by mistake, and it was for \$52.84. It was part of my job that I was supposed to clean up these accounts, and I inadvertently put in the wrong code, and that \$52.84 got deposited into my account. But instead of saying, 'We have a problem here,' I waited three weeks to see if anybody would notice."

Nobody did. So Del Vacchio thought, "Maybe I could take a little and maybe put some back after I win. I could pay them back, and no one is going to know about this stuff."

In a year, he'd taken \$100,000. "And I knew I could never pay that back. But I couldn't stop. So another year went by and I was still doing it, still getting that high, that euphoric feeling, and now my stakes went from \$1500 doubled to, like, \$3000, and the \$100,000 in the first year went up to \$300,000-plus in the second year. I was just chasing and chasing and chasing, and I needed more of a rush, more of that feeling."

It wasn't that Del Vacchio never won. "Oh, God, no," he says. "There was one weekend where I won \$76,000. But that \$76,000 lasted me probably ten days. Then I made another deposit and another deposit."

In the end, it wasn't Pechanga that discovered what Del Vacchio was doing. "They were making so much money," he explains, "that they didn't even notice that it was gone. It is hard to fathom nobody noticed that almost a half a million dollars was missing. But when you have \$60 million a month going through the place, a half a million is kind of a blip on the screen to them, especially when it goes out in \$1000 increments.

"Fast-forward to February 27,2005. My wife called me and said, "What is going on? The

bank put a freeze on our account.' I had contacts at Wells Fargo, and I called them, and I knew what they were going to tell me, that there was suspicious activity going on in my account and it was suspended pending further investigation. But I figured I could talk my way through this. I concocted a crazy story about how another person at Pechanga, who they knew was a kind of shady character, had made me do it so he could fund his gambling activities. I was talking to the senior vice president at Wells Fargo. He told me, 'Paul, we can't do anything, we can't do anything for you. I would get an attorney if I were you.' Right then and there, I knew it was over. My last bet was February 28, 2005. I had run out of money in my offshore sports book."

On March 2, 2005, Del Vacchio was led out of the casino in handcuffs but was later released pending further investigation. That afternoon, he told his wife, who thought he'd quit gambling 11 years earlier, the whole story. She was crushed. "But she found some strength inside her, and she's standing by me, which is an enormous blessing."


Two weeks later, Del Vacchio was arrested at his home and charged with 26 counts, including embezzlement, grand theft, and illegal computer access. He spent five nights at the Southwest Detention Center, in Riverside County, before being bailed out by friends and family. He and his attorney have worked out a plea deal directly with the judge for a maximum four-year sentence. In the meantime, he's sold his house and driven his wife and kids back to New Jersey, where they will live with her mother. With time off for good behavior, he expects to spend two years in prison. "I am going to miss two years out of my kids' lives and my wife's life," Del Vacchio laments. "But that is not a life sentence. Whereas had I continued doing what I was doing, that was a life sentence. That would have ended up in death."






Why do dogs wag their tails when they're happy?

Uh, Dave, dogs also wag their tails when they're pissed, so we'd better clear up this mystery before some dobie takes a chunk out of your butt. All in all, there may be no animal that does more communicating than a dog. Virtually every bit of its body is involved at some point in a messagesending task. Pack animals need those skills. Smell is the main communication tool. Since most smell-producing glands in a dog are in its back end, you can understand why they're so interested in that area, even though our hindquarters aren't as information packed as the dog might expect.

Scientific observers of dog behavior contend that a dog's wagging tail signals an emotional conflict of some kind, or a degree of excitement. Puppies generally don't wag their tails until they're about a month old, when they start asserting their individual personalities and play-fight with their littermates. In human-dog interactions, we see tail wags when the dog is happy to see its owner but apprehensive at his lower status in the dog-owner pairing. In dog-dog interactions, you will often see a tail raised high and wagging slowly as a threat before a fight. The act of tail-wagging squeezes the anal scent glands and sends a smellogram to the other dog to let him know what's what.

Internet Gambling

ambling is one of those activities that's okay when you do it but should otherwise be discouraged. Last week the U.S. House of Representatives passed, 317 to 93, a gambling protection bill that will keep U.S. land-based casinos free from competition.

The Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act of 2006 bans (by prohibiting bets from leaving the borders of individual states via the Internet) online sports betting, poker, and casino gambling. The act commands banks to block online payments to Internet gambling sites, gives the feds authority to "work with" Internet providers to block access to specific websites, increases jail time and fines for miscreants, and assigns, over three years, \$30 million for the prevention of illegal online gambling.

Never mind that we are awash in gambling. There are 13 Indian casinos in San Diego County. Your corner liquor store or neighborhood family grocery store will be happy to sell you lottery tickets. Too tired to leave the house? No problem, buy Super Lotto legally on Internet. Hie thee to www.elottoplay.com and sign up today.

I don't mean to overlook that, for a lousy \$100 tank of gas, you and your loved ones may motor to Las Vegas. On the other hand, you might prefer to do your gambling before arriving in Las Vegas. Why not try one of many familyoriented casinos spotted along all the public roadways leading to the Vegas Strip? How about a few hands of blackjack in Searchlight, Boulder City, Pahrump, Henderson, Jean, Laughlin, or Primm? Perhaps Arizona is more to your liking? Why not begin your gambling fun at one of the fine Arizona casinos nestled close to the worldfamous Colorado River?

And then, there is the long established, but almost forgotten, gambling on horses. The Del Mar season is on, but if slogging out to the track is too difficult, why not stop by a neighborhood simulcast outlet conveniently located in Barona Casino, Sycuan Gaming Center, and Viejas Casino. Still too far? Well, you can legally bet on horses on the Internet. Go to www.voubet.com ("U.S. Based, NASDAQ Listed") and get on board. The family-loving folks at Youbet will allow you — indeed, help you — bet on races in 100 parks around the world. I'm talking about longtime, high-quality gambling centers known as Aqueduct, Churchill Downs, Del Mar, Hollywood Park, Pimlico, Santa Anita Park, Saratoga, Arc De Triomphe (France), Dubai World Cup (United Arab Emirates), plus tracks in Australia, Canada, United Kingdom, South Africa, and Hong Kong. Gambling excitement right from your living room couch, 24 hours a day!

Indian and Nevada casinos, using the Internet for sales of lottery tickets and wagering on horse races, remain legal under the Internet Gambling Enforcement Act of 2006. Here's a spot quiz: Which organization is most supportive of the new Internet Gambling Act? (A) Mothers, Dads, Schoolteachers, Children, War Heroes, Astronauts, and Nurses Against Internet Gambling. (B) Family Council of Families. (C) Nevada and Indian Casinos, California Lotto, California Horse Racing.

The utility of propaganda is making something appear to be what it's not. Buying a lottery ticket isn't gambling; it's better schools. Betting on a horse via the Internet isn't Internet gambling; it's keeping alive an American tradition. Can't you see the old guy in a tweed sports coat, stopwatch in hand, a foggy 5:00 a.m., a county racetrack, and the tiny one-legged gimp riding War Chest around the oval? War Chest will win the Kentucky Derby at 200 to 1 and the old guy will adopt the tiny gimp and they will raise thoroughbreds on their Kentucky farm. Dodah. Do-dah.

Of course, propaganda works in both directions. Most supporters of the bill don't know that MasterCard and Visa have been refusing Internet gambling transactions since 2001. That hurt Internet gambling for a year and then the industry figured another way to transfer money. One suspects that with 12 billion dollars a year as incentive, Internet gambling thugs will continue to find ways to efficiently accept other people's money.

This bill or versions like it have been around since the mid '90s. The Senate is unlikely to vote on this version this year. But, it will resurface next session.

If passed, HR 4411 would stop a certain amount of Internet gambling. Prohibition stopped a certain amount of alcohol consumption. The question is, is it worth the money it will take to enforce the new law? Is it worth the hassle? More cops, more laws, more lawyers, and more jails will hand the feds another reason to regulate the Internet and give them another avenue into your computer. Is it worth it?

You could, at least partially, regulate Internet gambling. Most Internet gambling outfits would be happy to accept some oversight and pay what amounts to protection money to the United States government in return for being left alone. This is what we do every April 15th. Seems to work most of the time.



Father Acker first addressed the congregation clad in a white cassock with an embroidered green stole knotted into his rope belt. His chasuble hung over a nearby

chair. In contrast to these formal trappings, his bare toes peeked out from his sandals, and a guitar hung around his neck as he readied to join beginning guitar student Jack in playing "When the Saints Go Marching In."

The effect caught the feel of the space a school auditorium, three rows of folding chairs, and a couple of electric candles vs. the brass cross emblazoned with the traditional IHS, the heavy cloth over the chalice, and the lace cover atop the table holding the water and wine. The service, in fact, was a mix of structured liturgy and personal interaction: Acker, now genuflecting repeatedly at the altar with his back to the congregation, now listing a host of first names during the intercessory prayers. (Besides the more formal intercessions for those in adversity and those who have

"departed this life in thy faith and fear," Acker named "those in need of thy healing touch...those in need of strength and guidance...those who are homebound...those serving in our armed forces...those who are traveling....")

Apart from these personal asides, the liturgy stuck close to the Book of Common Prayer. (As he administered Communion, Acker repeated, "The Body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was given for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life. Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee, and feed on him in thy heart by faith, with thanksgiving.") Because of the language, additions and departures were notable. When Acker reached the prayer for the Bishops, he mentioned "Rowan, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the primates of the Anglican Communion" and "all the clergy of the Anglican Communion Network chapter here in the diocese of San Diego, that they may, both by their life and doctrine, set forth thy true and lively Word.'

Acker's sermon asked the questions, "How

do we come to know Jesus?" and "How do I know that I know Jesus?" and answered, "Knowing Jesus starts with seeing who He is and accepting what He gives." The Gospel recounted Christ's telling Simon Peter to cast his nets one last time, Peter's amazed cry of "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man!" and Christ's assurance that, in the future, Peter would be "catching men." Acker provided both chronological and geographical context and then observed, "Jesus was not merely going along picking up disciples here and there. Jesus knew Simon Peter for over a year, and he knew Andrew, James, and John. Jesus was not some Svengali who said, 'Follow me, follow me.' They knew who he was. They weren't being asked to walk off a cliff."

Acker continued, "How do you get to know someone? You spend time with them." And as you do, you share in Peter's recognition that "the reality of our life is here, and what God wants that reality to be is over here."

But after that, "we find we become friends of God. What's important to God becomes important to us. We see how we participate in His plan, not only for our own lives, but touching the lives of those around us." And we gather as a church, "that we might support one another in our life in Christ."

After Communion, Acker anointed Walt, a congregant scheduled for surgery, "beseeching our Lord Jesus Christ to sustain you with His presence...and that Thou would bless the surgeons, the nurses, and all those who look to his needs." He prayed over a couple celebrating their 17th wedding anniversary,"that they might so love, cherish, and honor each other, that they come to all the joys of Thy heavenly kingdom." And he accepted 64 cents -"heavy coin" — from Iim, who was celebrat-

ing his 64th birthday. "Watch over thy servant Jim, O Lord. As his days increase, strengthen him when he stands, comfort him when discouraged or sorrowful, raise him up when he falls, and in his heart, may he find peace which passes understanding...." All prayed together: "Many happy returns of the day of thy birth. May seasons of joy be given. May God in his mercy prepare you on earth for a beautiful birthday in heaven."

What happens when we die?

"We receive God's promise of life with Him through the baptismal covenant," says Acker. "Baptism isn't static, but a dynamic incorporation into the risen life of Jesus by the forgiveness of our sin. Without His promise, we are left to the mercy of God. God chose to love us and create a way to live with Him forever. In His love, He wouldn't force it upon us. But God bids us to choose life, life with Him."

Last time, I burned out two blenders," sighed Bernice as she began plans for another summer margarita bash. "I guess I'll have to serve them on the rocks this year."

"But the slushiness is 90 percent of the fun!" I protested. "You can't get to Margaritaville on the rocks!"

I promised I would look for help, but this time, help found me. The next morning, a truck parked alongside my neighbor's house as they set up for the husband's 50th birthday party. The truck pulled a trailer bearing the logo of The Margarita Man (619-575-2565; www.margarita-

mansd.com). The Man was delivering an industrial-sized frozen-drink machine; Bernice's party would be slushy after all.

The Margarita Man Company first started in San Antonio in the '80s," said San Diego owner Bill Thompson."I thought the concept was cool, so I bought into the franchise.'

The margarita machine works its slushy magic this way: "There's a refrigerated barrel with rotating blades on the inside. As ice builds on the walls of the barrel, the blades shave it off. Eventually, you have more ice crystals than liquid, so you get a frozen drink. There's a lot of science behind making a frozen margarita" for one thing, the precise ratio of water to sugar to alcohol.

What makes the drinks, said Thompson, are the high-quality mixes. "In trade shows, they have been consistent gold and silver winners. They're made with fresh fruit and fresh fruit juices. The most popular one is the traditional margarita, which is a lime drink. The mango mix is our second most popular — either for margaritas [tequila] or daiquiris [rum]." Other flavors include strawberry, passion fruit, pina colada, mai tai, lemon — the list goes on. "If you factor in making the drinks with tequila, rum, vodka, or virgin, we have the capability of making about 60 different drinks.

Working with the Man begins with making a reservation. "People can call or visit the website. I recommend as much lead time as possible — a couple of weeks is

not unheard of," especially around July 4 and Cinco de Mayo. On delivery day, "You know we're coming, because we call about 15 minutes before we get there. Party prep tends to be stressful, and we don't want people worrying, 'Where's the Margarita Man?'

Upon arrival, the Man unloads the machine, "which comes on a wheeled table, and we put it wherever the customer wants it. We can provide a 25, 50, or 100-foot 12-guage extension cord. The machine needs only a standard household current — 115 volts — but because it's a heavy appliance, it needs more amperage. We need to isolate the machine electrically. I've had calls where people are panicking --- the machine is making noises and the drinks aren't quite frozen. It's usually something simple, like Aunt Betty plugged in a power strip and three

to throw that stuff down the sink."

"It's a crime against humanity

Crock-Pots right where the machine is. It's just a matter of moving the plug."

After the machine is set up, "it's time to go to margarita school. We grab our bucket, our giant spoon, and whichever mix you've chosen" — there are 25 available — "and head for the kitchen sink. We make the first batch for you, but we also talk you through it so you can do the next one." Water, mix, and alcohol (provided by the customer) get measured into the bucket. "Our goal is, number one, a good tasting drink; number two, a drink that

will let people relax and get a little happy without taking them from zero to stupid in a big hurry. We try to create a mediumstrength drink: about three liters of tequila

for a batch of margaritas, and about two liters of rum for rum-based drinks. You end up with about four gallons of room temperature raw material that we take and pour into the machine. We show the customer how to turn it on, and the first drinks should be ready in 30 to 40 minutes.

Even so, Thompson recommends starting the machine a couple of hours early. That way, "the liquid in the machine is

also refrigerated, and it speeds up the process as the party wears on. Also, the machine has a lowlevel sensor that lets vou know when you have about 25 drinks left, but if it's a 90-degree day or if there are 90 people there, I recommend just lifting the lid off the machine and seeing if the level is low." Thompson provides straws and 9-ounce cups,

which works out to about 70 drinks per batch. "But if a guy shows up with a 7-11 Big Gulp cup, we can't control that."

He warned that "people gravitate to the machine. I consistently hear customers say, 'I've got so much beer left. I shouldn't have bought two cases,' or two kegs. I try to educate consumers about not overbuying other alcohol, but it's hard to enlighten the first-timers. Repeat customers know the drill."

Thompson's phone number is on the machine in case any concerns arise midparty, and he keeps his phone on until 7:30 p.m. seven days a week. At party's end, "all the customer needs to do is turn off the machine and go to bed. They don't need to clean it or drain it — maybe just wheel it into a spot where it

won't get rained on. When we come pick it up, we save the leftovers, because they're awesome on the rocks — it's a crime against humanity to throw that stuff down the sink, so we save it for them. If they don't have Tupperware, we'll put it in a Ziploc bag.'

Cost for the Margarita Man: \$170 for the first machine, \$150 for each additional machine. Price includes one mix, cups, straws, umbrellas, table skirt, and salt rimmer. Extra mixes cost \$20, and the Man leaves more mix than you think you'll need. Unopened mixes may be returned. There is a temporary delivery charge of \$10-\$30 (depending on location) until gas prices go below \$3 a gallon.

There was a blind guy with



"Yeah, beh beh, we sure did," I said, pausing from folding a pair of pants to return his calming smile with a pathetic smirk. "So much so that I am as disappointed as I am relieved to be going home." I longed for the feel of my bed and craved the permanent organization of the drawers and shelves in my closet and bathroom; but I couldn't stop thinking of the other things awaiting my return, things that are not so comforting yet all too familiar — like the mountain of bills and notices requiring my "prompt attention" that was waiting for me at the post office. Like the manila envelope leaning against my door, the one that contains the agenda for a homeowners' association meeting that I, the association's current president, must be prepared to facilitate in two days.

The thought of one task would remind me of another until my mind was racing uncontrollably and, overwhelmed by their simultaneous weight, I had the urge to say, "Fuck it," and crawl back under that fluffy blanket. I realize I have 28 days worth of shit to get done within the next three, and I am beginning to freak out.

Lowell, who owns a herd of 60 pygmy goats, explains that it was in the early 1970s when zoos on the East and West Coasts began importing the animals from north Africa.

"The National Pygmy Goat Association was founded in 1976 and promotes pygmy goats by setting breed standards, registering the animals, maintaining a database of pedigrees, certifying judges, and sanctioning pygmy goat shows around the country. A lot of those shows are in conjunction with fairs. Washington and Oregon have a lot of pygmy-goat activity. There's a lot of activity in California, Arizona, Illinois, Ohio, and Michigan. We've got pygmies in Alaska and in southernmost Florida. Pygmy goats are everywhere."

Thirty-eight of the National Pygmy Goat Association's 2000 members live in San Diego County. But that figure, cautions Lowell, doesn't give an accurate impression of the total number of San Diego's pygmygoat owners.

"I'm sure there are many people in San Diego who have a couple of pygmies as pets and who don't really want or need to belong to a national organization. To get an idea of how many San Diegans actually own pygmies, you'd need to talk with someone who's really involved in the local pygmy-goat community."

On an early winter morning I drove out to Sue McCullough's Riverside home, where for the past 30 years, McCullough, using the herd name Pygmy Palace, has bred and sold pygmy goats. When I began

calling around to get a feel for San Diego's pygmy-goat community, several owners said that San Diego enjoyed a national reputation for high-quality pygmy goats. When these owners suggested the SDPGA, or San Diego Pygmy Goat Association, as a good source for information, they as often suggested that I speak with a woman named Donna Elkins, who had something to do with the SDPGA. I knew so little that for a long while Donna Elkins was a mystery to me. These same pygmy-goat owners also mentioned Sue McCullough, saying that she was one of only two or three people in Southern California licensed by the National Pygmy Goat Associa-

tion to judge pygmy goats at shows and fairs. They

said McCullough's many years of pygmy-goat experience, and her familiarity with pygmies in San Diego, would serve as a good introduction to the pygmy scene.

Over the phone, McCullough was passionate about pygmy goats.

"I remember the first time I saw one 30 years ago. It was only three days old, and it was the cutest thing I'd ever seen in my life. I just love 'em, and it makes me feel good when I sell a pygmy to someone who loves 'em, too.

"A few years ago I sold one to a young man in Newport Beach. At the time, he wasn't sure if the zoning in his neighborhood would allow his family to have a pygmy. But he was so enthusiastic, I sold him a pygmy anyway. Not long ago I called him up to see how things were going. He said, 'This goat has really become a member of the family. We love him. We don't care if there are any zoning problems. We'd rather move than give him up.' "He said that the pygmy was a 'chick magnet.' He loves to take the goat for walks on the beach because girls just flock to him and the goat because it's so cute."

McCullough has a youthful voice, and although I knew that her pygmy-goat experience spanned several decades, I was surprised when she told me she was a 52year-old mother of two grown children.

"My kids grew up around pygmy goats. We always had 'em around."

McCullough's ranch-style home is shaded by an enormous chinaberry tree and sits in a semi-rural area that looks like parts of Lakeside or eastern El Cajon. Dun-colored scrub makes a life for itself on dusty, rock-covered hills. It's a place where zoning laws allow folks to surround their property with high fences and keep some livestock. In McCullough's case this

has meant a couple of horses, a couple of dogs, and as many as 49 pygmy goats.

"I smell goat," I said as soon as McCullough slid open the big glass door in her living room that opens to 1.3 acres of land behind the house.

"You smell Mike and Poly Royal," McCullough said, waving to a chainlink pen a dozen yards north of her patio. "My two bucks. You don't want to pet them. Bucks pee on their beards it's a mating thing. And in general bucks have a strong smell. If you pet 'em, you'll have that goat smell on your hands all day.

"A castrated male is called a wether. If you castrate a male, his hair won't grow long and shaggy and he won't have a strong smell. The females, or does, and the wethers don't have a strong smell at all. They smell mostly like hay." The bucks' strong

fatty acids that give goat milk and goat cheese their characteristic

'goatiness." If you've ever eaten goat cheese, you've had a hint of how Mike and Poly smelled. According to The Fabrication of Farmstead Goat *Cheese* by Jean-Claude Le Jaouen, as goat cheese ripens, bacterial action releases capric, caprylic, and caproic acids, making the goatish flavor more pronounced. A mature goat cheese tastes more strongly of goat than does fresh goat cheese. And fresh goat milk has less goat flavor, I was told by several pygmy owners, than does goat milk that's hours or days old.

I said to McCullough that I'd read that pygmy milk was of a very high quality, that its butter fat content was greater than that of milk produced by dairy goats.

"But milking a pygmy requires a lot more patience than most people have," McCullough said. She pinched together her thumbs and index fingers and made a delicate, precise milking motion. "Their teats are very small.

"A pygmy female produces about two pints a day, which is enough if you want to feed kids, but not enough for commercial purposes."

As I walked up to their pens, Mike and Poly Royal eyed me and bleated.

"They want attention," McCullough said.

Mike and Poly had dense long hair that fell below their knees. The hair on their ankles was so long that it partially obscured their tiny cloven hooves.

("When you want to show a pygmy," McCullough later explained, "you'll often want to trim their beards and the hair around their ankles. You of course will brush them and clean them. If you're very particular, you'll use a little black shoe polish on their

smell, which isn't entirely unpleasant, comes from the same

hooves.")

Mike was black with white frosting here and there on his coat, and Poly was, according to McCullough, a "red caramel," which to me seemed a bright coppery color. The bucks' hair reminded me of a German shepherd's coat, only coarser and with more body and curl. It looked as if it would be pleasant to touch.

But upon closer inspection, Mike's and Poly Royal's beards did appear damp, and the smell radiating from the bucks was higher than when I stood farther away. The smell wasn't sulfurous, like the smell of decaying protein, or the smell of waste from meat-eating animals, nor was it sour the way that fermenting fruit, like grapes, or fermenting milk can be. The bucks' smell was pungent in the way that fresh-ground coffee is pungent. It also had a musky, mineral-like quality that came, I guessed, from the ammonia in their urine.

"For humans, it's not a very attractive smell," said McCullough. "But the does like it."

As if to prove McCullough's point, two eight-month-old does, whom McCullough released from a nearby pen, scampered over to Mike and Poly. The effect was immediate. The bucks stuck out their dark pink tongues, lowered their heads, raked the dirt with their little front hooves, and started sneezing and sputtering. While the does capered in front of Mike's and Poly's pens, the sneezing and sputtering intensified.

"It sounds like they've got bad sinus problems," I said.

"It's called 'blubbering," McCullough said. "It's a mating thing."

She explained that pygmies were "precocious breeders," meaning that does, if not carefully kept apart from bucks, could get pregnant when just two months old. She said that does came into season every two months, had a fivemonth gestation, and gave birth to between one and four kids.

Association for adult pygmies.

"They cannot be over 24 inches at the shoulders. The females are a little smaller. The males tend to be a little larger, a little bulkier. I would guess that Mike

and Poly each weigh about 75 pounds. Their coats give the bucks a bulkier look."

Pygmy fanciers like McCullough often describe the typical pygmy-goat body as a "barrel with legs."

McCullough contrasts this body type with that of Nubian goats, which are "basically a smaller, slimmer version of a dairy breed." But to my eye, the barrel description isn't quite accurate. Pygmy bodies don't have



a tubular shape: they don't look as if they've swallowed a barrel. The pygmy ribcage bows abruptly outward: it looks as though the goat has swallowed a small flying saucer or a large, round cushion.

This unusual appearance often causes confusion among laypeople.

"Ninety percent of pygmies look pregnant even when they're not," said McCullough. "Even the neutered males look pregnant. When you go to fairs, people are always asking if the neutered males are pregnant." I asked McCullough what she, as a licensed judge of pygmy goats, looked for in the animals.

"Okay, you want nice, wide shoulders. You want a short muzzle in the face. You want their nose to be short and wide. You want a good spring of rib. When looking over the top, you want the body to be wide. You want them to be cobby." Cobby?


between the chest, the width between the back legs, and you want the legs to be straight."

I asked McCullough about pygmy tails. Did they count for much? You want just a medium slope to the rump.

"In half of pygmy goats, the tails don't fan out. But when we show them, we foo-foo them up. I've even curled their tails with curling irons, you know."

While McCullough busied herself, releasing a half-dozen or so eightmonth-old does from their pen ("Come on out, girls! Run around! Have some fun!"), I sat on a stanchion, a platform used for grooming the goats and trimming their hooves. Several of the does started racing around, pumping their short legs as they ran, leaving cartoonish puffs of dust where their hooves dug into the soil. All of a sudden two does leapt into the air and came down fast, their heads lowered, as if they were going to butt each other. But at the very last second, they slightly altered their angle of attack so that their foreheads didn't quite meet. It was mock-butting. They were playing.

While the others raced, several came over to inspect me and nibble on my fingers and on the sleeves of my jacket. Unlike dogs, these pygmies didn't mind meeting a human's gaze. They

One of the does started to rub her forehead against my knee. One of them, pure black, jumped into my lap and rubbed her soft, fuzzy muzzle against my face. My reflex was to embrace the goat and make cooing noises. The goat's reflex was to cuddle more closely against me. This was the famous pygmy-goat affection I'd heard about. It's not only that pygmies don't mind being approached and touched by humans, it's that they seek out and seem to enjoy human contact and attention in a doglike way.

When I spoke about this endearing behavior with Niki Boyd, animal care supervisor of the Children's Zoo at the San Diego Zoo, she explained that "domestication of animals takes thousands of years and a genetic change. People have been breeding goats for thousands of years. And goats are a herd animal, so they're naturally social. Humans have bred goats for many purposes, for meat and for milk, and it makes sense that if you're going to have an animal around, you'd prefer that it be sociable rather than aggressive."

The little black pygmy rubbing its muzzle against my face, and my reaction to this contact, was the product of a relationship that went far back in time. But, said Boyd, there was more to it than that.

"It's also a matter of human contact when the animal is young. It takes a lot of time and dedication to gain an animal's trust. Not all domesticated animals are tame. Not all domesticated animals seek out human contact."

What Boyd said explained why McCullough's pygmies were so cuddly. McCullough told me that when her pygmies were babies, she tried to bottle-feed as many as possible, and throughout their lives, she tried to spend as much time with them as she could.

McCullough, standing in the barn she used for her pygmies, pointed out the stereo system she'd installed to play soothing music for does in labor, and the closedcircuit cameras she'd installed to keep an eye

on them, too.

"You should see a kid when it's three days old. That's the cutest time. They suddenly discover that they've got feet, but they're not quite sure how they work. They try to jump

on things. They stumble. They're trying to learn." While McCullough

She told me that she

and I walked around her property, she pointed out the new chain-link pens she'd had constructed for her pygmies.


earned my first \$100, I went out and bought a horse. It was a really mean animal. You buy a horse for \$100, what do you expect to get? But I just petted him and said, 'Oh, it's got pretty eyes,' and I bought him. I've had animals ever since." As we walked

around the brand-new pens, McCullough grew reflective. "After I found out I was sick, I thought, 'Why not? Why not just go ahead and enjoy life?' And so I had the new pens put in. I only hope that I'm around for a long time to enjoy my goats."

I asked McCullough what was the matter. She told me that some months earlier she'd been diagnosed with a serious illness. She'd already had surgery, she said. She pulled up the left sleeve of her blouse to show me a shunt, wrapped in surgical gauze, implanted in the flesh above her elbow. "That's where they

inject my medicine. I told my doctor that I wanted the shunt up here on my arm, out of the way, because a couple of friends of mine have pygmies that are about to have kids and I wanted to be able to help midwife them. I really enjoy that. And I didn't want the shunt lower on my arm, where it might get in the way or get contaminated."

When we went back inside McCullough's





home, she went to the kitchen and scrubbed her hands and forearms with bactericidal soap. "I have to be careful about germs now. But, you know, I love to pet my goats."

McCullough told me that she bought her first two pygmies for about \$200 but that now, in the big world of "show pygmies," an animal with an award-winning pedigree could fetch as much as \$1300. She said the highest price that she'd ever gotten for one of her own was \$800.

"I do very well at the Del Mar fair. This past

year [2005] I went with 16 pygmies and came home with 3. I made \$2200 in the first four days I was there."

Aside from the business angle, I wondered what McCullough's involvement with pygmy goats had offered her.

"To me, it's the kids," she said, referring to her own two children. "It's the best thing, raising kids around animals. Keeps them off the streets, away from drugs. They're busy with their animals, they do the fairs, the FFA --- the Future Farmers of America — which is in high school. When they're younger, they can do the 4-H. And it's really good. They spend a lot of time grooming their animals, getting them ready for fairs. They make money that they can put aside for college."

But what had she personally gotten from her pygmies?

"It's the affection. The enjoyment."

Until I started learning about pygmy goats, I never thought about the bond people might form with animals other than

the usual house pets. But McCullough's devotion reminded me of Phyllis McQien, an 81-year-old Ramona resident who's a kind of legend among San Diego's pygmy-goat owners. McQien doesn't belong to the National Pygmy Goat Association or to the San Diego Pygmy Goat Association. She was never much interested in showing her pygmies or winning awards.

"At one time I had as many as 15 pygmies as 'house goats,' McQien told me on the afternoon I called her. "One morning I woke up with a pygmy standing on my bed, staring at me and nuzzling my face. After that, I started keeping them penned in the kitchen.

"I of course had them trained to pee in a Kitty Litter box. They're very smart, and they're easy to train that way. I once had a four-day-old kid who learned to use the litter box by watching the cat. The kid was so tiny that he could barely get his legs over the side of the box, but he just climbed right in and used it."

McQien declined to meet me in person because her health, she said, wasn't what it used to be. Some days, she said, she has a difficult time getting around. Although she didn't feel well, she didn't mind talking about pygmy goats.

"I just fell in love with them the first time I saw them. I think it was at an animal auction in Escondido. I'd moved up to Ramona from El Cajon. After my son died in an automobile accident, I wanted to get away from El Cajon. It was already starting to get industrialized at the time I left. Down there along Pioneer Way. In fact, I named Pioneer Way. When we first got there, we didn't have running water. Just wells. We were like pio-

neers. So, after my son was killed, I just wanted to get out of El Cajon and have some land where I could have my animals.

"I was born in Washington, D.C., and lived there until I was eight years old, when we came out to San Diego. When I was a little girl in D.C., I was always the kind of child who'd befriend the neighborhood dog, no matter how ugly, who had a thorn stuck in his paw. I'd pull it out and make him feel better. And I had an aunt who had a farm outside the city, and she had a horse. I remember going there to visit, and she let me ride. I always loved animals. "Out here in

Ramona I've had as many as 27 pygmy kids at one time. I'd go sit out in the yard, and they'd get up in my lap. I'd clap my hands and they'd come. I'd put two in my lap and bottle-feed 'em at the same time. It was just such a great pleasure."

McQien said that over the 30 years she raised pygmy goats, she gave away at least 100 to individuals and families who showed a sincere interest in the animals.

"I had rules. I never gave a pygmy to anyone who wanted the animal for meat. I didn't want people to eat them. Because they're small animals, a lot of Asians like them for barbecue. Once I started raising them, Asians would come around. They'd rub their bellies and look at one of my goats and say, 'I've got a good home for you!' And I'd say, 'Oh, no you don't!' And I had another stipulation. Whenever I gave a pygmy away, I always told the people, 'If for any reason you can't feed or take good care of this animal, please bring it back to me.' In all the years I raised pygmy goats, I had no more than a half-dozen


returned to me. "I was very serious about their care. I kept a few dairy goats for milk so that the people could bottle-feed their pygmies. I'd milk the dairy goats and put the milk in a refrigerator I kept outside. It was the honor system. People could come by and take what they needed and leave a donation, a dollar for a gallon, whatever they could afford. To me, it's important that you bottle-feed 'em, because when you bottle-feed 'em, you're their mama.

"They're really not much trouble to look after. I learned to do it all by myself. My pygmies were always pretty healthy. I learned to burn off their horns, which you do when they're one week old. I'd give 'em a tetanus shot. I guess their care just came as second nature to me. And it's easy to learn to do something when you love it.

"People would ask me, 'How do you do it? How do you manage all those goats?' And I'd say it was easy because the goats are so intelligent and so kind. They'd be out in the field, and in the early evening I'd go out and clap my hands

and they'd come running to the gate. I never had to go chasing after them. They're such affectionate little animals. They don't hold a grudge. You can get kind of aggravated at 'em and holler at 'em, but they won't hold a grudge. They're much better than people in that respect. And I think they're better than a dog because of the affection. Unlike a dog, they want to be around you all the time."

McQien told me that now she had only five pygmy goats. Her inability to tend to more was a greater source of disappointment to her, it seemed, than her health.

"But I make do with my five. When I can, I like to go out and sit by my back door and call to them. They'll come running over, and I get to pet 'em and talk to 'em and enjoy their company. They're a great source of joy to me. Peo-



ple say that pygmies live only 12 years. I know I've had some pygmies for 15 years. People say that they don't live that long, but I know that they do."

Joy and affection are only two of the benefits

that accrue to pygmy ownership. As Sue McCullough said, learning to care for animals, to take responsibility for their welfare, can play a significant role in a child's maturation. To learn more about this, I visited Sycuan Casino to speak with 22-year-old Nicole Fletcher, who, I'd been told, started raising pygmies when she was a little girl. Eletcher works in

Fletcher works in the casino's human resources department. Winsome, blonde, she shook my hand with self-assured firmness. Although she was born and raised in Jamul, only 30 minutes from downtown San Diego, Fletcher has what I think of as a country girl's gutsiness. She told me, for example, that of pygmy bucks, wethers, and does, the bucks were her favorite.

"They smell really bad and their hair grows long and needs a lot of maintenance and they spit when there's a doe in heat but, I don't know, I just really like them. Does are really friendly and wethers, well, wethers want to be everybody's friend. But bucks are a little standoffish."

Fletcher said that she got her first pygmies as Christmas presents when she was five years old.

"My dad had visited a farm back east that his grandparents had owned, and he said that we'd *never* own a farm animal. I started with guinea pigs. When I was five I had some friends in school that were in the 4-H program in Jamul. My one friend had a pygmy that followed him around and knew where the cereal cabinet was. This pygmy knew how to let himself into the house. I ended up with one just like that. For Christmas I got a doe named Sunflower. We got her from a breeder in Lakeside. My parents paid \$250 for her, and she came with a friend that was a wether that cost \$50, and his name was Butterscotch. Actually, his name was Huey, but I didn't like the name Huey. Pygmies go better in pairs. They're social animals, herd animals, and they do better if they've got another pygmy to bond with."

Fletcher said that as soon as she got Sunflower and Butterscotch, her parents made sure that she took care of them. I wondered how much these lessons in responsibility cost.

"Pygmy goats are expensive because they don't produce anything. It's not like a dairy goat, which you can milk and sell the milk, or you can raise them for meat and then sell the meat at auction at 4-H. So, hay is \$12.50 a bale, then the grains are \$10 for a 50pound bag. And then you had the vet bills. For the care and feeding of my pygmies, I'd estimate

that my parents were spending about \$450 per month."

Fletcher's pygmycare schedule started, she said, every morning, seven days a week, at 5:00 a.m.

"My parents always said, 'They don't have hands. They can't feed or look after themselves. You've got to do it.' So my days started at 5:00 a.m., and we had to be at school by 8:30 a.m. School was just down the road, a 20-minute walk. I took care of my pygmies until I had to leave for school, and a couple of times I cut it really close. There were

the daily things you had to do, like feed and water them, and there were monthly things you had to do, like deworm them and trim their hooves. In the afternoons I spent about twice as much time with them as I did in the morning, which included running around and playing with them. On weekends sometimes I'd spend all day with them."

So much quality time with the pygmies paid surprising dividends. Fletcher's goats learned to do tricks.

"My goats could walk on their back legs. They could open gates.

They could open sliding glass doors and screen doors. They knew where the cereal cabinet was. I had one who could pick oranges off the tree. Oh,

even learned to roll over." Fletcher said that at

the height of her involvement, she had 15 pygmies.

yeah, he loved oranges. The acidity was really bad for him, but we couldn't keep him away from the oranges. And I had one pygmy that

"And there were chickens — we didn't really keep track of those. I had ducks, guinea pigs, rabbits. I had about 30 rabbits at one time. I had rats. I had turtles. I had a horse, but it didn't last very long. And, for other 4-H projects, over the years I had a pig and I also raised seven cows for market."

Sunflower and Butterscotch launched Fletcher into a fullblown lifestyle, much of which centered around 4-H meetings and activities. I asked Fletcher to describe 4-H in a way that most people could understand.

"4-H stands for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. It's for helping the community, reaching out to others. It's an

after-school activity, and it does not just include animals, although that's how it started out. Now there are a lot of 4-H groups in cities that do the arts and crafts part of it. It teaches you what school doesn't teach you. With the animals, you know, there are life lessons to learn through the showing of the animals, the politics of it, and through the care for an animal.

"FFA, or Future Farmers of America, is more of a high school thing. FFA and 4-H sometimes will show their animals together. However, now El Capi-

tan and Escondido are the only high schools that have FFA. La Jolla used to have it, but they don't anymore."

I told Fletcher that I had no choice but to ask her about the politics of pygmy-goat showing in San Diego. She laughed and rolled her eyes.

"It's like anything else. Often the judges are breeders as well. If they recognize their animal, or they recognize another judge's animal, or one of their friends is showing an animal, for some reason, no matter what my goat might be like, the animal the judge knows ends up at the top of the line, and it ends up with the grand prize. So you learn to go along. And it's just play. You learn, for example, to palm your animal off on the right person, if that's what you're trying to go for. If winning is what's important to you.

"They'll often have shows just so that 4-H kids are able to show only against other 4-H kids. However, the judges do still manage to find someone that they've run into at previous shows and bonded with. And their animals seem to end up at the top of the line. So, you learn to make friends."

I asked if Fletcher had noticed any trends in pygmy-goat breeding.

"Yeah, there were times, you know, when I first started, and you'd sit there at a show and all you would see was caramels. You'd have a whole class of caramel, and you'd have only one agouti. An agouti is salt and pepper, gray and white, speckled. And the agouti would be at the back of the line.

"And for a long time they were breeding for pygmy goats that weren't technically in the best of health because they deviated so far from the breed standard. They were a lot shorter and a lot heavier than what they should have been,

and they looked like they were all pregnant all the time. They had short necks, short noses, and very short legs, and they didn't carry it very well. But that's what people bred for. This was around 1995 through

1997. These goats were probably very cute, but they weren't, technically, pygmy goats.

"A lot of these animals had been bred back east, and people were buying and bringing them in. Some of us realized that the way these goats had been bred wasn't quite healthy



area, right between their eyes. A lot of the goats from back east didn't have that. Their faces were flat, and their bodies were bulky, like a dairy goat's."

Fletcher's knowledge of pygmy-show politics and trends in pygmy breeding came from a childhood and adolescence that were, by any measure, very full. In addition to her daily chores and going to school, Fletcher attended, on average, ten 4-H meetings per month and "at least" 16 pygmygoat shows per year. Since she left home, Fletcher said, her involvement with pygmies has decreased. She now has only four pygmies, two at her parents' home and two that stay at a girlfriend's house.

around San Diego's pygmy-goat community. Elkins was, like Sue McCullough, a National Pygmy Goat Association-licensed judge. Elkins was also the driving force behind the founding in 1991 of the San Diego Pygmy Goat Association. Elkins was, I was told, part of the reason why San Diego enjoyed a national reputation for the quality of its pygmies. "I think we had only

about eight or so families involved back when we started the association," Elkins said when I got her on the phone for a few minutes. "I saw people selling animals that were kind of inferior. The idea is to breed a healthy, productive animal that's going to lead a long, healthy, happy life. We started the San Diego Pygmy Goat Association to improve the line. To give the community some animals that were competitive. It's not that winning is everything. But losing all the time is kind of disheartening."

I didn't have an easy time connecting with Elkins. For five weeks we exchanged voice-mail messages and had brief conversations. Gradually, I learned that Elkins had three grown daughters. One of her daughters was getting married. There were all the difficulties and complications of planning for a daughter's wedding. And then there was the wedding. And in the wedding's aftermath, Elkins came down with pneumonia.

What I didn't know about Elkins during the five weeks I kept calling and leaving messages to pester her to talk about pygmy goats and the San Diego Pygmy Goat Association was that Elkins was married to a San Diego Police Department detective. I also didn't know that Elkins and her detective husband, after raising three daughters of their own, had decided to become foster parents to two young children whom Donna had met while teaching Sunday school at her local church.

Donna Elkins had a few things on her mind other than suspicious phone calls from a jumpy writer who for some reason had taken an interest in pygmy goats and the San Diego Pygmy Goat Association. I now suspect that when Elkins, the wife of a detective, had a free minute or two, she consulted the pygmy-goatcommunity phone tree and made a few calls of her own to find out just what it was that I was up to.

ber morning, Elkins's blue eyes were bright and clear. Her face wasn't puffy or creased by a night of deep sleep. She seemed cheerful, if a little cautious. I wondered if she was the sort of person who never slept or if her eerie predawn alertness was common among wives of detectives.

I was wearing three layers of clothes and my teeth were chattering. Elkins, trim, athleticlooking, wore jeans and a pink sweatshirt that zipped up the front. With a green garden hose, she casually filled the watering trough used by her two pygmy does, seven-year-old Mystique and five-yearold Buttons. Elkins chatted with me about her two llamas, Lucy and Socks, and about Cassie, her corgi, and Domino, her border collie, and about the crabby,

ungrateful Cochin rooster Elkins had adopted that liked to attack her ankles. She was offhandseeming until she asked, "So what sort of article are you planning to write about pygmies?"

The day before Elkins asked that question, we'd talked for a while over the phone.

She told me that she was a "Chula Vista beach girl, and believe me, it was to everyone's astonishment, including that of my friends and family and even my own, that I became a pygmy-goat person. At my 20-year high school reunion, I won the award for the strangest job: pygmytrauma if they tried to help a doe in labor. 

Elkins told me that she eventually started breeding and raising her goats under the herd name Proverbial Pygmies and that she served on the board of directors for the National Pygmy Goat Association for six years. She said that 30 pygmies was the most she tended at any one time. She now has 12, including Mystique and Buttons. The others stay at a girlfriend's ranch not far from Elkins's home. The San Diego Pygmy Goat Association now has 20 active members.

"And if the National Pygmy Goat Association has almost 40 members in San Diego, I'd probably estimate that there are almost 200 people in the county who own pygmies. "We're definitely in the top ten percent of pygmies in the nation. I don't think I've been to a show where a San Diego pygmy didn't end up in the championship.

"Now, of course, Ohio and North Carolina have a high percentage of strong animals. Out here in California, Linda Henwood's pygmies up at Whirlwind Farms near Sacramento are considered to be some of the very best. But our pygmies here in

San Diego can go up against Henwood's pygmies anytime."

Toward the end of our talk, I asked Elkins what seemed to her the most rewarding aspect of her work with pygmies.

Eilmer of Malmesbury, a 11th-century Benedictine monk, studied math and astrology - was even a wizard, some said. As a young man he read the story of Daedalus in Ovid's Metamor-

feathers and wax for himself and his son, Icarus. If they flew too low, Daedalus warned, sea spray would sog the wings and drag them down; too high and the sun would melt the wax. But if they kept to a middle way, they'd "swim in the sky like a gull."

Daedalus strapped the wings to his arms and rose aloft. He made careful swoops to show his son how to fly. The boy took off. As the maze receded beneath him, Icarus wanted to test the limits of his father's "splendid toy." He climbed so high the wax began to drip. He pumped naked arms and plummeted, through a hail of feathers, into the sea.

Eilmer built an apparatus like the

one in the poem. He jumped from Malmesbury Tower. After soaring an estimated 125 paces, he fell and broke both legs. Over the centuries many died in similar attempts. By 1883, says historian Octave Chanute, people wanting to fly got so much ridicule they "strenuously denied" their experiments. The most obsessively secretive was John J. Montgomery. In 1881, when his family moved to the Fruitlands, a ranch in Otay Valley (just south of the I-5 and Main Street intersection in Chula Vista), Montgomery was away at college, but already had a reputation for eccentricity.

As a young boy in Oakland, he put a pillow on the living room floor, spread himself across it on his stomach, and waved his arms as if swimming through the air. To study their movements, he chased his grandmother's geese across her backyard by cracking a whip (she always wondered why they flew "so much better than her neighbors' "). He inspected houseflies and hummingbirds, observed how seagulls held the wind, lifted vultures by the talons to note the flex of their massive wings. "The boy never let a bird rest," recalled younger sister Mary. "It must fly for him."


At 16, he tossed a curved piece of scrap iron into the air. Instead of gliding smoothly, like a bird, it spun in strange circles, quirky leaps. It would loop, hover, and lurch upward before sticking in the ground.

"Why didn't it come straight down?" Montgomery wrote years later. "Why did it turn and settle?" The puzzle triggered his first ideas of "aerial navigation that were more than merely the vague desire to fly."

Montgomery earned a master's degree in science in 1881 from St. Ignatius College (now University of San Francisco). To make money for a PhD in the sciences, he became foreman of his father's 80-acre ranch in 1882. Soon, he converted the barn into a lab. Tall trees surrounding the old, weathered structure aided its secrecy — and his reputation for eccentricity.

He always walked head down, deep in thought. Neighbors heard he could get so engrossed in his studies he'd forget to eat. Others said he was either hypersensitive or suffered from vertigo. Rose B. Clemens of Coronado recalled going to parties at the Montgomery and neighboring Couts farms. John always got a "joshing from young people in the area." When he passed by, they tapped their temples knowingly.

"The banter," writes biographer Arthur Spearman, made Montgomery "a recluse." When he built a plane, or

tested one on nearby mesas, he swore everyone who knew, including neighbors who helped, to secrecy. Even in letters to his six brothers and sisters, Montgomery wrote "as though the mail would go to the wrong persons."

By 1883 Montgomery had made numerous attempts at what he called "soaring flight," including models and a "super balloon" in Oakland that popped and zigzagged out of sight with his father's best hatchet as ballast. Flight, he said, has three phases: take-off, actual flying, and landing. When two flappingwing designs failed to lift off from Otay Mesa, in February, 1883, he changed his strategy. Forget phase one. He'd concentrate on flying and landing.

When not tending vineyards, Montgomery worked in the barn. A gyroscope he built to study movement of the planets stood on a table next to a homemade earthquake recorder (he



even made a copy of Thomas Edison's "talking machine" and the tinfoil records it could play). Models of gliders and wings of failed experiments hung from above or collected in corners. At night, kerosene lamps and the blazing forge outside flicker-lit the lab.

Throughout the summer of 1883, he and younger sister Jane worked on a "gull machine" to ride air currents like its namesake. To bend wood, he connected a box to the forge with a long pipe. Using the box as an airbellows, John and Jane

steamed pliant strips of ash, shaping them into curved ribs. They tacked them on the walls to dry next to the stretched wings of birds Montgomery had shot to study.

To cover the cambered ribs, they experimented with different thicknesses of wax on unbleached muslin. They sewed the cloth to the ribs with heavy linen thread, then applied oil, which gave each 10-foot-long, four-and-a-half-foot-wide wing a brownish tint.

For a fuselage, they attached two 20-foot ash crossbeams to the wings,

then added a fanshaped, horizontal tail. Using shoulder straps and a saddle - a hardwood keel suspended from the framework to sit on ----Montgomery would maneuver the craft by turning his body. A "pushpull rod," connected with piano-wire pulleys, would move the tail up and down and provide stability. The "Gull Glider" weighed 38 pounds. Montgomery, then 26, weighed 130.

Before dawn, on Tuesday, August 28, 1883, John and younger brother James hitched mules to a wagon. By the light of a

single lantern they unhooked the Gull Glider from the wall. Stealthful as spies, they nestled the craft in the wagon on a cushion of hay, covering as much of it as they could.

In case nosy neighbors were up and about, the men wore faded workclothes and carried box lunches and rifles: just out for an early morning hunt. John drove. James stood beside the tall driver's seat, one hand on a rifle, the other on the glider as a shock-absorber.

Like several members of the family, including John's twin-brother

Thomas, James was a nonbeliever. He'd seen John's early flapping-wing attempt at Oakland, plus the two at Otay Mesa, and wasn't impressed. His brother was no mad scientist, as neighbors (and the 1946 movie, Gallant Jour*ney*) alleged, just a gifted one, as stubborn as he was curious. But when it came to flight, James thought John resembled Noah and the ark. Sixty-one years later, James told a reporter: "My young mind — I was 19 at the time — was inclined to side along with our friends, who thought John's dreams of flying

were a gigantic folly."

They bumped up a canyon road southeast to a mesa and into streaks of dawn. They made a right turn (near today's Montgomery High School) and beat a path through crackling scrub and greasewood to the rim of Wheeler Hill. Before them, four miles to the west, the Pacific Ocean lay like a silver-blue saber. South, Tijuana's popular Hot Springs Hotel rose amid scattered one-story adobes. The isolated hill - now Montgomery Waller Community Park — tilted for over 200 yards into a prevailing

northwest wind. The early morning breezes blew a steady seven miles per hour.

Wheeler Hill was no random choice. Those who knew Montgomery called him one of the most cautiously ambitious of experimenters. He wasn't jumping from a tower. Nor was he out for a joyride. The windswept hill had a gentle, tendegree slope. Dry vegetation and loamy earth would soften a fall. And Montgomery expected to make many as he mastered the "science of the bird."

James attached a light, 40-foot launching rope to the glider and stretched it 12 to 14 feet down the hillside. John climbed into the craft and straddled the seat-board. Since this hobby-horse position cramped a running start, he decided that rope and wind were a better means of propulsion. At 8:00 a.m., the brothers began waiting for the right moment.

Around 10:00, a gust

whistled up the hill, lifting a wing off the ground and John up to his toes. He raised the other wing, steadied himself, and yelled, "Ready, Jim?" "Yes."

"Pull!" James yanked the rope taut and tugged it down the hill. "Suddenly the rope went slack and I nearly fell on my face." He looked up and saw a looming black expanse, backlit by the sun. "There was John in the soaring machine right above me. He was so high that the rope was barely touching

along." James froze. Few had ever seen the sight. John "soared over me like the biggest bird you ever saw and kept on going."

the ground as it went

James got up and raced down the hill, shouting like a madman and, because he couldn't take his eves from the airborne machine, stumbling over clods of dirt.

"John was flying! The nearer he got to the

ground the more he kicked his feet and swayed his body to keep balance. Toward the very end of his flight he veered to the right to miss a clump of brush, and when he landed he came down so lightly he hardly bent his knees."

"Jim, I've got it!" John shouted. "I can fly!"

As they dragged the glider back uphill, John described what happened. When he jumped, the craft shot upward. In an instant he was "at the mercy of the wind," high enough to break bones if he fell. Fear shocked through him.

But he found himself moving "gently forward," as if cradled in the air. The wings gave solid support. A "feeling of security" came over him. "There was a cushiony softness about it, yet it was firm." He floated, then dropped in a steady descent down the hill, soaring a dozen feet above ground until touching down.

"When I found the machine would follow my



movements in the seat for balancing, I felt I was selfbuoyant."

Before a second flight, the brothers paced off the distance: 600 feet. "John repeated his flight many times that day," James told a reporter years later, "but he was satisfied after the first hop that new worlds had been opened."

As they prepared for what became the final try, John positioned himself on the saddle. James pulled the rope taut. A blast of wind whipped across the mesa. The craft twisted. A wing dipped, caught a bush, and cartwheeled the machine 10 feet into the air. The wings contorted like a shutting fan, then plunged into the slope. Montgomery wasn't hurt, but one side of the glider was "smashed past mending."

John and James waited until nightfall to smuggle the wreck back to the barn. Montgomery was so secretive he refused to report his success to newspapers, even to neighbors. It was as if it had never happened.

What actually did is still subject to debate. Spearman calls it "mankind's first heavierthan-air controlled flight." Others, however, question the length of that first "hop." Six hundred feet two football fields would take the Gull Glider to the bottom of Wheeler Hill. Fred C. Kelly, one of Montgomery's most vehement critics, argues that the gilder's 90 square feet of wing area would have needed much stronger winds to carry 168 pounds (Montgomery's and the glider's combined weights) that distance.

There's no proof Montgomery even flew gliders, Waldo Dean Waterman, a pioneer aviator from San Diego, told the Union. "No eyewitnesses." Waterman said the entire account was a fabrication concocted by the Montgomery family and Rep. Bob Wilson, who was instrumental in the founding of the monument on Wheeler Hill and the naming of Montgomery Field. In 1950, Wilson and James went back to Wheeler and paced off the flight: 603 feet. Waterman labeled the

Octave Chanute's Progress in Flying Machines (1894) listed Montgomery's best attempt as "100 feet" — a typo, or skepticism for an undocumented attempt? In a 1909 article in Aero*nautics*, Montgomery again claimed 600 feet. Was he correcting Chanute or, as some argue, lengthening the original hop to take undeserved credit?

Many alleged that Montgomery had no eyewitnesses. But several testified in court. Asked if Montgomery was successful with an 1884 flight, neighbor Charles T. Couts told a judge "Yes sir!"; Charles Burroughs, another Otay Valley resident who helped with several 1884 flights, said most "ranged from 200 to 300 feet."

Montgomery's neighbors could be biased. But so could his critics: Fred C. Kelly was the Wright brothers' biographer and wouldn't want someone

flying a heavier-than-air craft 20 years before Kitty Hawk. As a high school freshman, in 1909 Waldo Waterman experimented with gliders off Banker's Hill, at Albatross and Maple. If he could debunk Montgomery, his would be the "first winged, mancarrying flight in San Diego."

Tom D. Crouch offers the most reasonable estimation: Montgomery was "the first American to leave the ground on wings of his own design."

What gets lost in the wrangling are Montgomery's initial reactions. He was elated not about a distance but a sensation: he'd experienced the feel of flight — a buoyancy, "like floating in water, only a lot lighter," and a give-and-take with the wind. To get that feel, he must have soared some distance, though not necessarily 200 feet. At the same time, he was also disappointed.

When Montgomery built the curve-winged

Gull Glider, he "followed nature blindly, going against my reason." And even though "the first experiments with this crude device were a success," he scrapped the design. He needed to control the craft's side-to-side roll as well as its pitch. For the next three years, he tried several machines with flat wings and diagonal aileron-like hinges (possibly the first of their kind). They took off from a wooden track he'd built on Wheeler Hill. Though flights ranged "from 200 to 300 feet," and had better equilibrium, they didn't give him the lift of the Gull Glider.

After hundreds of experiments — including studies of water flow, waving flags, airborne he wrote his sister Margaret in 1885: "My theory from the beginning has not changed; though at first it was not by any means as clear as now; and I can assure you the task has been a difficult

one. I have had to dispute the ground inch by inch with myself."

He defined his problem as the "theory and practice of nature's aerodynamics." He became so determined to solve it, if he "should be beaten by others in my problem," he wrote James in 1886, "it would kill me."



How would you like to visit a faraway neighborhood that really isn't very far? It's an unconventional sort of place, but a closer look might surprise you with something familiar.

> Borrego Springs intimates a distant outpost, despite its being less than two hours removed from San Diego's busy populace. Cradled on three sides by the Santa Rosa and San Ysidro Mountains, exaggerated distance emerges from surrounding seclusion. Mount Toro, the big bruiser in the northwest corner, climbs to nearly 9000 feet and renders a striking contrast to the 500-foot desert floor. The eastern perimeter appears unobstructed, but along much of that gentle rise linger the mudhills of the Borrego

Badlands, a Grand Canyon in miniature. Adding a man-made partition, Anza Borrego State Park encircles the desert community. The isolation is complete, and the outside world diminishes to a vague apparition.



silent, you can hear a subtle wind playing its lonely lyric on the telephone wires.

* * *

Speaking of lonely, what kind of neighborhood is this, where are all the neighbors? Borrego residents come in two distinct varieties: part-time and full-time. We won't see any of the first group at this time of the year. Snowbirds, and their specialized cousins the Golf Goonies, have taken flight for a more hospitable summer's roost. Can you blame them? Would you opt for the summer if you lived here only part of the year?

The real stuff of this place is the year-round resident, the Cactus People. It generally requires a stubborn tenacity to endure the desert's middle months. Some do it by choice and others out of varying necessity or fate. The explanation behind my former claim to the title of Cactus Person is simple: Mom and Dad made me do it. My parents lived out their last 25 years in Borrego, and my younger brother still lives there. He has known no other home since age two, and therein lies his explanation: It is home.

The Cactus People once boasted uncommon character. I am out of touch with the present population but do recall some personality from the past. Gilbert Rock looked a lot like an elderly Randolph Scott (the early western film star). Time and the wide brim of his cowboy hat hadn't stopped the sun from creasing his face, but a twinkle still shot from his friendly blue eyes. A slow walk and a fast smile well suited his firm wit and easy tone. Rocky loved to play checkers, and he found the ideal counterpart in my dad. Both proclaimed to the game's demanding skill and their own cunning genius. What a pair they made. Hours of gamesmanship and bantering, each staking claim to the world title, while professing never to have met a more able opponent.

I don't think I'll ever forget Thanksgiving at Rocky's. Time has perhaps dramatized the scene, but the reflection evokes an era from well before November in the '60s. In the 1930s, Rocky claimed a 160-acre homestead adjacent to Clark Dry Lake. Reaching his patchwork cabin, sandwiched between Borrego Mountain and the Santa Rosas, required about ten miles of unpaved road — slow turns in the soft sand interspersed with stretches of bumpy washboard. Ageing possessions, long past their prime and purpose, surrounded the weathered

structure that Rocky called home. A rickety porch with simple wooden chairs furnished the perfect spot for stories about cave drawings. Rocky once told me that he would show me the whereabouts of the drawings, but we never found the time. I still wonder about their truth.

You should suspect stories about Borrego that originate from a nearby town. A primary



route to Borrego passes through the hideously pined mountains of Julian, home to the Appleheads. Doubtful that you can find a parking place in Julian, but if you do, beware the accosting pie salesman. He spreads ugly rumors solely to blemish desert appeal and save the apple trade. Backwoods capitalists who have spent most of their lives sucking too much hard cider and thin air are not reliable sources of information. I am intimately acquainted with the Appleheads' hapless paranoia, having attended high school in Julian. Prior to 1966, Borrego didn't have a high school, and we rode 30 miles to and from Julian for a higher education. Just another peculiarity of the time and the place.

I should have told you to wear a hat. You're looking a little funny, and maybe we should find you some shade. Sure, there's shades in Borrego. Look to the north of the valley and you'll notice row upon row of tamarisk trees that once served as windbreaks for grape ranches (there were also lesser crops). The trees are still there, but the vineyards have gone south with the *bracero* labor.

When I was a teenager in Borrego, school may have spelled long bus rides, but summer vacation meant haring on a dark purple cab and only half a floorboard to block the engine heat. A blistering speed of three miles per hour didn't help but was necessary to allow swampers time for their work. As the truck groaned through the field, one swamper walked in the truck's dust and muscled

vest time and the availability of plenty of jobs. I've picked grapes, packed melons, and pruned trees, every one of them an ordeal. You wouldn't think that driving a truck through the vineyard roads would be too tough. But try it with the hot desert sun beat40-pound boxes of grapes up to the truck, while a companion on the truck bed hoisted and hurried the cargo into neat stacks. A few thousand boxes per day will quickly strip the fat from under your burnt hide, put a few splinters under your fingertips, and cul-

What Happens When a Doctor Makes a Mistake

"SHE'S CONTRACTING EVERY SEVEN minutes and liquid is coming out." It was a Sunday morning in early March, and I was the doctor on call for family practice and pregnancy-related matters. This call from a concerned father-to-be would have seemed ordinary except that Ronnie, the laboring mother, had a May due date.

"You need to take her to the hospital right away; it looks like she's going to have her baby early," I told him. "Have you registered at the hospital already?"

"Yes."

"Then go straight to the third floor. I'll call them and let them know you're coming." I did so and asked the nurse to monitor the baby, perform a sterile speculum examination to confirm that she had ruptured her membranes (her bag of waters), and to do a vaginal culture for a particular bacterium, the Group B streptococcus.


Ronnie's baby had an estimated gestational age of 31 weeks and 2 days; 8 weeks and 5 days remained before he would reach his due date at 40 weeks' gestational age. Women can go into labor this early for many reasons, most of which involve infections of either the urinary tract, the vagina, or the uterine contents. If the membranes remain intact and labor hasn't yet reached the active stage, with the cervix dilated four centimeters or more, we can often delay or stop labor with medications, treat the underlying cause of the preterm labor, and give the baby's organs, particularly the lungs, a chance to mature. We can use medicines to hasten lung maturity when we think we will not be able to keep the baby from delivering before 34 weeks' gestational age.

When the membranes rupture, things get more complicated. Ruptured membranes stimulate labor, and almost all babies, no matter what the gestational age, deliver within ten days after rupture of membranes. Leaking membranes also give vaginal bacteria free access to the amniotic fluid, facilitating infection of the fluid and membranes if they weren't infected already. If the mother develops a fever, foul-smelling fluid, pus in her fluid, or other definite signs of infection, it becomes too dangerous to keep the baby inside, so we treat with antibiotics and allow labor to progress on to delivery. Because of all this, definitive determination of the membranes' status is an important part of these patients' initial evaluation.

As I gulped down my lunch in preparation for a trip to the hospital, Kathy, the triage nurse, paged me to say Ronnie's uterus was contracting with moderate strength every two to four minutes. I asked if the membranes were ruptured, and she said they weren't, a pleasant surprise given that Ronnie had told me she was leaking. I ordered Kathy to give Ronnie a subcutaneous injection of terbutaline, which usually slows or stops the contractions of early labor, and I drove to the hospital.

I entered the triage area through the door just to the left of the labor and delivery area's main desk, passed the curtains closed around the patients undergoing evaluation, two on each side of the central walkway, and proceeded to the triage desk, tucked in a corner on the right. As the fetal monitors broadcast their rapid thumps as though dueling for recognition, Kathy brought me Ronnie's prenatal record and the news that she was still contracting every four to seven minutes. "I have the setup for the sterile speculum exam," she informed me, "except that I haven't found a place to plug in the light source."

This didn't make sense to me. I had



ordered the exam to be done upon Ronnie's arrival, so when Kathy had told me that the membranes were not ruptured, I assumed she knew this because she had done the exam.

I processed this information as I squeezed through the curtain and around the metaltray table holding the speculum and other instruments to arrive at Ronnie's right side. The 32-year-old African-American's hands and legs trembled, not from fear but from terbutaline, one dose of which can make you feel like you've had about ten cups of coffee. She and her husband listened to me explain the exam and why I needed to do it. She consented. Kathy found a light with a long enough cord to reach the outlet across the room, so I gloved up and placed the sterile speculum between my hands, a more symbolic than effective gesture that tells my patient that I am trying to avoid putting an ice-cold speculum in her vagina.

I asked about the fluid, "When did you first notice you were leaking?"

"Friday night. I thought I was losing control of my bladder. It slowed down a lot yesterday, so I wasn't as worried, but today the contractions came harder and I was leaking more, so we called you." So she might have had ruptured membranes for over 36 hours, plenty of time to develop an infection. But she felt well, and she didn't have a fever yet.

After about 15 seconds of attempting to impart some warmth to the cold metal instrument, I advanced it slowly into her vagina. Despite our attempts to be gentle, this exam is painful for many pregnant women, and Ronnie was one of those women. It didn't help that I needed to get a good look at her cervix and therefore had to exert additional downward pressure to position the instrument, a move that brought tears to her eyes. I didn't want to have to check her cervix with my gloved fingers because each cervical check increases the infection risk.

As I opened the speculum, a pool of clear fluid flashed into view, and I had my answer. I stuck a piece of yellow nitrazine paper in the fluid, and it instantly turned deep blue, confirming that this was amniotic fluid. Using a Q-Tip, I then swabbed some fluid onto a slide, removed the speculum, and took the slide over to the microscope.

She had talked to me Friday night, and I had somehow missed the diagnosis. Hers was one of several calls that came in between 10:30 and midnight, and I was having a maddeningly difficult time recalling our conversation. It took me several hours to put it together as best as I could, but I did recall that she had told me she felt a constant discomfort in her lower abdomen that would get worse "for a couple of minutes" and then diminish. I made sure she clarified that she meant minutes and not 40 to 60 seconds, which would suggest early

labor. After a short conversation, her descriptions satisfied me that she wasn't in labor, and I told her to drink plenty of fluids and call me if her symptoms worsened.

This was malpractice. When an obstetric practitioner gets a phone call from a pregnant patient, there are four symptoms that the conversation must cover: contractions, bleeding, fetal movement, and leakage of fluid. Residency faculty drill these four elements into every resident's head. The malpractice lawyers also know them and look for them in every documented



phone contact in the records they review. I somehow forgot to talk about Ronnie's fluid, and she didn't mention it to me. I called our answering service and asked what Ronnie had told them when she asked them to call me, and their records showed that she complained of pain and "losing control of my urine." The service must not have relayed that second part; either that or I am losing my mind.

So, thanks to me, Ronnie walked around for 36 hours with her membranes ruptured nine weeks before her due date. If I had sent her in for evaluation Friday night, we could have started antibiotics to help prevent infection and given her two corticosteroid shots to help her baby's lungs mature. Instead, Ronnie was coming in now in early labor. Her temperature crept up to 100.1 degrees, which was enough for Mickey to decide that we should not delay delivery. Since Mickey was managing the situation, I wished everyone well and went home.

I have made mistakes before. When I was a second-year resident, I was on call one night when I had already admitted four patients to the hospital and therefore had not slept at all. It was 4:00 a.m., and an ambulance brought in a sixtyish-year-old, cheerful, obese man with an "asthma attack." We treated him with asthma medications and he improved, but I recognized that it is not common for someone who has never developed asthma to get his first attack in his 60s. I ordered a chest X-ray. I looked at it. His heart was big, and the blood vessels to the lungs showed excessive engorgement. I had found the sort of trouble I was looking for; the man had congestive heart failure (CHF), a condition where the heart does not contract with enough force to push forward all of the blood that comes to it, and therefore the circulation backs up into the lungs, filling them with fluid. But my body had such a strong desire to sleep and my fatigue had clouded my

judgment just enough that I was able to create a new interpretation and convince myself that it was correct: the X-ray showed CHF, but his clinical course was consistent with asthma, so therefore the X-ray was wrong and I could send him home. Much to the patient's delight, he went home and I went to sleep.

When I awoke 90 minutes later, my senses had returned. I got a well-rested resident to call him and admit him. The patient felt better than he had in days, but he did come back, which was a good thing because he had also had a heart attack. Later that morning, I went to Dan, our residency director, and offered to take whatever punishment he felt was appropriate and wondered if I should rethink my career choice. I was being too hard on myself, of course, and he pointed out that I had found my mistake, fixed it, and done the appropriate introspection afterward. The patient did well and, ironically, left the hospital thinking I was a great doctor.



I was a bit less lucky with another patient, a 22-year-old-blonde-former-cheerleader-type who came into my office a couple of years ago with a bladder infection, which I confirmed by examining her urine before going in to see her. Early in training, we learn to assume that a woman of child-bearing age who comes to a doctor for any reason is pregnant until proven otherwise. I asked her if she was using birthcontrol pills, and she said no. She then brought up that she and her fiancé were getting married that weekend and going to Maui for their honeymoon. My wife and I had spent our honeymoon

there, so we talked some about that while I examined her back and abdomen. I never returned to the topic of her contraception. I prescribed her the standard three-day regimen of a sulfa drug and wished her the best.

Two days later, two days before her wedding, she called me to tell me, in a voice boiling over with hatred, that she was pregnant. "I *knew* I might be, but you never asked," she sneered. The problem: sulfa drugs in high doses cause fetal toxicity in rats. Reports of such toxicity in humans do not exist, but the findings in rats have led the FDA to place sulfa drugs in Category C for pregnancy, which means they should not be used unless the physician judges the benefits to outweigh the risks. She proceeded with her verbal assault, accusing me of lacking professionalism and ruining her wedding. She would make sure that none of her family or friends would ever come to me for care because of my incompetence.

I resisted the urge to reply, "You BITCH! You deliberately withheld information that you knew I needed to know and put your baby in jeopardy. Is that what a good parent does? You set me up. And it's not like I prescribed thalido-

mide." Instead, recognizing that I had screwed up and that I was dealing with an immature woman who didn't know to protect herself and her baby, I congratulated her and attempted to persuade her that taking four doses of Sulfa almost certainly would not affect her pregnancy at all, which was true. I closed with a recommendation that she not set her future doctors up to make mistakes, because we are all human beings, and if we're given enough chances to make them, we will. Her baby must have done well because I never heard from her attorney.

With this baby, though, my oversight had the potential to lead to serious consequences, and I felt horrible. It didn't help that my head filled with visions of malpractice attorneys licking their chops and sharpening their tongs. Patients who sue usually do so at least in part because they don't like their doctor. From her perspective, I had missed her diagnosis, sent her into a cramped triage area, ordered a painful injection that made her shake like a leaf, and introduced myself by doing a painful speculum examination that made her cry. I couldn't escape the thought that this was all very, very bad. Upon arriving home, I told my wife, who provided her usual comforting magic, but she alone couldn't bring me out of my cloud. I called my boss and confessed my sins. "Not ideal care," he reassured me, "but not terrible. I think the baby will be fine. We'll just have to see what happens."

I then placed a call to Mickey, because I didn't know her at all, and for all I knew she had the common bias many obstetricians and other specialists have against family practitioners. Some refer to us as those "lazy family malpractitioners." Mickey didn't have that bias. "Like most experienced obstetricians, I know that this stuff happens to all of us," she explained. "I knew she was either the one in a hundred where you just didn't ask the question or she didn't tell you. It's remarkable that she didn't say anything about it."

"She's not the brightest crayon in the box" was how Ronnie's doctor explained that omission. "Don't flog yourself over it." Fine, I thought, but now my future happiness would depend on how well this baby did.

When I called labor and delivery that night at 10:00, the receptionist informed me that Ronnie had delivered two hours ago. As fast as I could, I dialed the number for the intensive-care nursery and waited for the baby's nurse to give me an update.

"He's doing great." Thank you so much. He was on a ventilator, but he had not required any supplemental oxygen, which is exceptional for such an early baby. When I went to see Ronnie the next day, she gave me a proud smile as she praised her three-pound, two-ounce baby's feistiness. And I can thank him for the loud reminder to remember the four elements: contractions, fetal movement, bleeding, and fluid leakage. I don't imagine I'll forget them anytime soon.

Thomas Larson's article, "A Tenth Grader's History of the World" (Cover Story, June 22), is excellent. I never have seen, in any generalinterest publication, a better exposition of the corrupt system that generates the so-called history textbooks that are used in American schools — books that are carefully designed to deceive students and to leave them ignorant of history.

In my capacity as the president of the Textbook League, I have urged my colleagues to study Larson's article as it appears on your publication's website. Larson's piece is outstanding for at least three reasons:

First: Before he undertook to write about the two "history" books that were used in San Diego's public high schools during the last school year, Larson examined the books. Bravo! It is obvious that no one can write about a book without reading it, but many reporters do exactly that. I have received various queries from newspaper people who wanted to write about textbooks that were being used in local school districts but who hadn't bothered to look at the books in question. Having learned the books' titles, these drones expected me to tell them what the books said.

Second: Larson often has reported his own observations, instead of contriving to put every substantive statement into the mouth of someone else. I have had

more than enough of reporters who refuse to take responsibility for anything and who write stuff like this: "Critics assert that the book weighs five pounds" (as if the book's weight were a matter of opinion or a subject of debate).

Third: Larson has properly exposed and analyzed the "According to" trick, one of the most vicious devices of deception that schoolbook-writers employ. When a malicious writer chooses to use this device, he fashions an "According to" statement that is literally accurate but in every other way is perverse. The writer accurately tells that "According to" some specified source, a particular event occurred — but the writer doesn't tell that the specified source has no standing as a record of history. Hence (as Larson tells

us) the textbook Glencoe World History simply says that "according to tradition-while Muhammad was deep in meditation, an angelic voice called out: 'Recite!' " Glencoe's writer thus strives to trick students into accepting, as an account of a real event, a Muslim fable that has no standing in the realm of historical scholarship. The public at large must recognize how schoolbook-writers systematically use the "According to" trick to delude students, to keep them from comprehending that a fact and a superstition are different things, and to undermine their ability to distinguish a claim that can be tested from a claim that can't. Larson has performed an important service by exposing this dirty practice.

I am greatly pleased by Larson's drawing attention

to Diane Ravitch's fine book The Language Police: How Pressure Groups Restrict What Students Learn. I hope that your subscribers will be impelled to buy it and study it and that it will make them mad as hell. A paperback edition, priced at \$13.00, was issued in 2004 by Vintage Books.

In my view, Larson's piece has only three serious shortcomings:

1. Larson states: "Steussy [i.e., Chris Steussy, a high school teacher] recalled one of his students asking him why the historical event recounted in the Steven Spielberg movie *Amistad* wasn't in [*Glencoe World History*]." Alas, that statement implies that Spielberg's film was a respectable presentation of history. It wasn't. It was fiction, devised not to convey history but to serve as commercial entertainment.

2. Larson reports that McDougal Littell's textbook Modern World History says, "According to the New Testament, Jesus of Nazareth was born around 6 to 4 B.C." That item demands some special analysis, but Larson hasn't provided it. Readers need to know that McDougal Littell's claim is ridiculous, because the datemarks "B.C." and "A.D." weren't invented until long after the New Testament's four gospels were devised. Moreover, none of the New Testament's gospels gives any sort of date for the birth of Jesus. The Gospel of St. Luke includes a tale that links Jesus's birth to the reign of Augustus, but the tale is patently fictitious. It contains a fatal anachronism, and it collapses when it is examined in the light of verifiable history. To make things worse, the Gospel of St. Matthew contradicts Luke by claiming that Jesus was born "in the days of Herod the king." The two other gospels say nothing at all about when Jesus was born.

3. Larson mentions California's official, published requirement that history and social-studies textbooks must be "based on the best recent scholarship," but he doesn't explain that this requirement (ostensibly applicable to all history and social-studies books for grades K-8) is flatly ignored by the schoolbook companies and by California's education bureaucracy. Here is a matter that must be brought to light. California's citizens, including California's classroom teachers, must recognize that our state doesn't enforce its best-recentscholarship rule and that our state certifies, adopts, and buys schoolbooks filled

with fatuous, antiquated notions that would make any scholar laugh. My own experience has convinced me that most of California's teachers believe that stateadopted textbooks have been examined for legitimacy, accuracy, and scholarly merit. Those teachers have been badly deceived. (California also has a rule stating that the material in history textbooks must present "a variety of perspectives." That requirement, too, is ignored.)

So much for my complaining. I close by saying again that Larson's piece is outstanding — and I thank you for printing it.

ur tagline is 'Three guys, 37 plays, 100 minutes.' But it's really three guys just brutalizing Shakespeare,'' says actor Bruce Blackwell. From July 21 through July 30, Blackwell, along with David Pinson and Jaysen Waller, will perform *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged)* at the Howard Brubeck Theatre on the campus of Palomar College.

The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged) was written for the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland in 1987 by the Reduced Shakespeare Company. The



contand in 1987 by e Company. The Company defines itself as "a three-man comedy troupe known for taking long, serious subjects and reducing them

into short, sharp comedies." Other Reduced Shakespeare Company productions include The Bible: The Complete Word of God (Abridged), The Complete History of America (Abridged), and All the Great Books (Abridged).

"The guys who put [this show] together encouraged [performers] to keep the show fresh and contemporary," says production manager Patrick Larmer. Larmer directed this production for Palomar Performing Arts once before, five years ago. "We had a funny line about Newt Gingrich, but it's only funny if Newt Gingrich is still the Speaker of the House," he says. "We also had references to Chernobyl, but it was so long ago, and it was a lame reference anyway."

Larmer feels free to update the performance because the original writers encouraged such revisions in the introduction to their script. "Please, have some fun and come up with your very own putdowns of annoying famous people where required," states the script's intro. The new show may contain a spoof on popular TV chef Emeril Lagasse. "We'll start with the script and go through it and say, 'Is that timely or funny?' At rehearsals, we're just throwing stuff out," says Blackwell. "Pat will sit there and we'll kind of go off on stuff, and we'll think we're hilarious and he'll go, 'You know, that's not so funny."

Because there are only three people to portray every major character from all 37 of Shakespeare's plays, the performance requires many costume changes. "In the first act alone, Jaysen and I 'switch on' eight characters, four for each of us," says Blackwell. During one segment of the show, in which Blackwell plays the nurse from *Romeo and Juliet*, Larmer shares, "...his breasts keep falling out of his shirt." Waller, who plays the majority of female characters, including Juliet, draws on Scarlet O'Hara for inspiration.

Othello is covered as a rap song: "Here's the story of a brother by the name of Othello / he liked white women and he liked green Jell-O / a punk named Iago, who made hisself a menace / 'cause he didn't like Othello, the Moor of Venice." For those unfamiliar with this tragedy, the hero Othello falls prey to the villain Iago's ruse that Desdemona, Othello's wife, has cheated on him with Cassio, Othello's lieutenant. In a jealous rage, Othello kills Desdemona and, after the truth of Desdemona's innocence is revealed, kills himself.

"They do the [Shakespearean] histories as a football game, and the football is a skull," Larmer says. "The whole second act is taken



up with Hamlet — they do Hamlet and then they do it fast, then faster, and then backwards." *Titus Andronicus*, a tragedy largely considered to be the bloodiest of Shakespeare's plays, is parodied as a cooking show.

Audience participation makes up part of the show. The original script advises, "…each audience is different. The actors should respond honestly to the audience's performance, and their own, rather than stick blindly to the written text."

"The premise is getting people to perform who are intimidated," says Larmer. "We learned to dread having real actors come up, who really wanted to act. I hate pretentious people; even more, I hate pretentious theater, and this is neither. *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged)* makes fun of a lot of contemporary acting, particularly over-thetop method acting. The show has nothing to do with sense-memory or inner motivation of the character."

"We always think people are going to be shy," says Blackwell. "So it's unexpected when an audience member does exactly what they're supposed to do. We might make them scream or run around and be a fool. I'm surprised at how well people would scream — they would just scream their heads off." — Barbarella





A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND | BY JERRY SCHAD

The "back way" up Mount Laguna via the obscure Kitchen Creek Road offers bicyclists a challenge to their strength and endurance, and little chance of serious interference by passing automobiles. The gravity-assisted return, down along the gently twisting Sunrise Highway, repays handsomely for all previous efforts. Travel by car or motorcycle along the same route is rewarding, too, though at times motor traffic is blocked by gates on the middle section of Kitchen Creek Road. Hikers and bicyclists can always get

Cycle up the back route into the Laguna Mountains, and descend via Sunrise Highway.

Distance from downtown San Diego: 48 miles Biking length: 26 miles Biking difficulty: Strenuous through, however. A possible starting point for the 26-mile looping ride described here is the Interstate 8 rest area at Buckman Springs, located some five miles southeast of Pine Valley. Cars are not supposed to be "abandoned" inside the rest area; to be legal, park outside the rest area itself and off the pavement.

On two wheels, head south from the rest area and later east on I-8's frontage road — Old Highway 80 — up and over a little rise to Kitchen Creek Road. Here begins the 12-mile trek from the scrublands of the lower o the higher slopes. The

Laguna Mountain foothills to the cool pine forest atop the higher slopes. The steady gain of 2600 feet of elevation on this lightly traveled roadway is interrupted twice, and then only briefly.

Nearly five miles into the climb, you pass Cibbets Flat Campground, which hunkers down amid live oaks lining Kitchen Creek. The creek, whispering now, could dry up completely by late summer. Around the next big bend, the road narrows and the smooth pavement is replaced by a thinner coating of asphalt — still smooth enough for the skinny tires of "road" (as opposed to "mountain") bikes. Up along desolate slopes you go, through buckwheat, purple sage, and chaparral. At last, the first Jeffrey pines appear, growing in protected hollows where sufficient water accumulates in the soil. Nearing Sunrise Highway, the pines grow denser, and black oak trees appear.







"Corey [Cooper, guitar] was an M&M," says Jessup. "We wondered why no one ever dressed up like an M&M onstage before.

Other Meaties have appeared as a Chippendale terrorist, a clown, a leathered biker, a Viking, and a dysfunctional basketball player. None of the band's grindcore/jazz/classical/metal songs are over two minutes long. Themes touch on Down syndrome pineapples, wolves with AIDS, and Shamu partying on the moon.

"People tell us our song about a gay dolphin sounds like Gwen Stefani," says Jessup. "[Audiences] see us and they think we're dead serious. If they heckle us, we don't care. Most people get our shows except for the stupid people who don't count in life anyway.³

Caught on Tape in Humboldt Jensen Rufe

joined the Zappa-esque punk band Puddletown Tom after he left Poway High. "I was ahead of the blink guys at Poway High by about two or three years." During his UCLA years ('91-'95), he came down to play local gigs. "We had a residency at Java Joe's. We played with the Rugburns and Jewel.... We played the Casbah and Soma, but we didn't get much of a fan base.'

When Rufe went to graduate school for film at Humboldt State, he played in Eureka-/Arcata-area bands and made a lot of music

videos. In 2001, he was hired by MTV/VH1, where he edited Making the Band, Road Rules, and Real World. Since



then, Rufe has created an hour-long documentary entitled Rural Rock & Roll, shot during an eight-day period last summer in Humboldt County.

"There are 100,000 people in Humboldt County. There are more people in Escondido than in all of Humboldt, but I would say there are 500 people that staunchly support live bands. Of them, 300 are in bands.... There are only two or three venues, a lot of house parties.... There were 50 other bands I didn't even get to talk to.'

For his film, Rufe mixed interviews and live footage of 13 Eureka bands.

"One band plays 'mountain metal.' They are construction workers with big beards. They say they are the only band that can build you a house.... Nine out of ten people up there have no delusions of grandeur. They are perfectly fine that no one will ever hear them outside of Eureka, which is what the film is all about... "I'd like to think there are

a bunch of Eurekas across the country." Rufe says the music scenes of Boise, Idaho; Bozeman, Montana; and

'This could be a traveling rock series.'

Rufe, on a West Coast tour with his film, will show Rural Rock & Roll on July 29 at the Whistle Stop Bar. A live set by the Ian Fays of Eureka (who appear in the documentary) follows.

Not About Drugs and Rims Though he injured his knee in Iraq, Marine sergeant Gabriel DeJesus reenlisted for another four years last August. The Camp Pendleton-based motortransport mechanic is on "light duty" due to his knee tear, but now he wants out of the military so he can rap.

"Even in Iraq I made tracks," says DeJesus (a.k.a. Technique). "I built a recording booth in back of a truck in a war zone in Iraq. My wife would send me blank CDs. and I'd make music I'd pass out. I wrote

music every day.... When I got back [to Camp Pendleton] I built a studio in my house.'

DeJesus, 23, says he tried to launch a group and record label with fellow Marines, "but it never went like how we wanted it to.' Discouraged, he reenlisted. Then, DeJesus met Lil Uno, the local artist who runs Sicko Records and hosts an all-locals radio show on 98.9.

"He was asking hip-hop artists to get in touch with him," says DeJesus. The two met, and Lil Uno offered DeJesus a contract that provides for studio time, CD manufacturing, and distribution.


"As soon as [Lil Uno] presented me with the contract, I took it up the chain [to get permission to leave the Marines].... [My staff sergeant] looked at me and started smiling. He said

he was a religious man and that things happen for a reason. He said my orders to get transferred to North







Carolina got canceled that day. He told me he was behind me 100 percent and that I should pursue what I had to pursue. Then the higher-ups, like, captains, started talking to me. They said it was better if I just stayed in."

Lemon Grove Avenue Brouhaha Begins Now

Despite allusions made by music reviewers suggesting otherwise, Minneapolis singer-songwriter Mason Jennings has never been a resident of Lemon Grove. In praising Jennings's 2004 album Use Your Voice, the All Music Guide website notes, "His sense of place and his emotional clarity are startling on cuts like 'Lemon Grove Avenue'..."; Omaha webzine the Old Pulp cited the same song's "hometown nostalgia."

Not unreasonable assumptions with lyrics such



DeJesus says he is researching how to exit the military but that if he is not released he will fulfill his obligation. Regardless of the outcome, he would be happy to represent the Corps in TV ads for recruiting.

"My lyrics are not about drugs and cars and rims.... At work, guys joke around with me.... I say, 'Who said I was a thug? Just because I'm a rapper does not mean I'm a criminal.' "

A Technique track will be included on Heatrocks, a Sicko compilation of local artists' music to be released in August. Sicko has plans to issue DeJesus's own CD on September 26.







A quick check of Tommy Emmanuel's references reveals a stint with Air Supply. He's also worked with Fric Clapton (who said Emmanuel was "probably the greatest finger picker in the world today"), Joe Walsh, Stevie Wonder, and Les Paul. The late Chet Atkins called Emmanuel one of the greatest guitarists on the planet and bestowed on him the title "CGP" — certified guitar player. Guam with the Wind

D'aah, is it Hawaiian? Is it Japanese? Is it Filipino? Is it Mexican? Hank and I are seeing items like kalua pig (definitely Hawaiian), chicken katsu (Japanese), lumpia (Filipino, of course), empanadas and ceviche, direct from España or Méjico, plus unknowns like kelaguen — all on the same menu.

But maybe we're onto something new. Here at Yokozuna's this isn't just a catchall selection from a Chula Vista kitchen with an identity crisis, but an authentic cuisine from one of the greatest Pacific crossroads-civilizations you've never heard of.

History 101: Guam's destiny was written in the wind. The trades blew everybody to Guam. The original Indo-Malay immigrants (over 2000 years ago), Magellan, the Portuguese explorer (in 1521); Spain's Manila treasure galleons (on their way across to Acapulco for 300 years); plus Filipinos, Chinese, Germans, Japanese, Americans...

And now my buddy Hank and me.

Okay, this isn't exactly Guam. We're opposite Southwestern College on Otay Lakes Road. But it feels pretty darned Guamanian to me. Girls buzz around us in hula skirts, black or pink, with white hibiscus flower silhouettes. They carry steaming piles of rice with meat glistening on top, or plates loaded with chunks of meat and ribs. They drop tropical-looking rattan blinds to keep the sun out. A street sign that reads "Kalakaua Avenue" hangs by the cash register. Probably Hawaiian. "Got pugua?" says another sign behind a display of Tshirts for sale. A bamboo sushi bar with nine tall chairs faces the entrance to the dining room. We get toothy greetings from Polynesian gods on totem poles. "Graduation Leis," says an old sign. Even the acoustic ceiling tiles have been thatched in rat-tan. Louie Castellanos's karaoke music's just starting up, over by a wall hung with autographed photos. Oh, there's Channel 10's Lee Ann Kim, and musicians, like the group named P.O.D. They come here because they have Guamanian blood this is comfort food central. Seems like a dance floor up the other end, and long tables where birthday groups can get together. Now a gal picks up a mike, stares down into a TV screen, and breaks out singing, "Ooo-oooh child / Things are going to get easier...

"This is so...Pacific," I say to Hank. "But why would they call this 'Yokozuna's,' as if it's Japanese, if this is about Guam and the is-

lands?...For that matter where da heck is Guam?" Later, I found out the answer to that one, because Carla had landed there once. "Guam?" she

said. "Hot. Muggy as hell. Couldn't see any trees. No palms. Lot of sand. And flat." Which is funny, because Guam is the summit of a couple of undersea mountains that, with an equal start, would make Everest look like Point Loma. The Mariana Trench dives to 36,000

feet. Like, seven miles down. Earth's deepest hole. Asia's shallow coastal waters plunge right over that cliff into the deep ocean there, right beside Guam. No wonder those treasure ships got sucked north. No wonder the Spanish took control of Guam for 300 years. It must have been the ideal provisioning post before the long haul across the Pacific. And since then the Americans, the Germans, the Japanese.

Result? A Pan-Pacific food festival! The Hawaiians brought ground-roasted pig, the Spanish brought spices, the Japanese brought sushi, the GIs brought, well, Spam.

"So let's be patriotic," Hank says. "It's on the menu."

The man is correct. Spam is the very first item

in the first column, which is labeled *pupus* — appetizers. "Spam Musubi, fried Spam sautéed in a sweet shoyu (dark brown soy sauce) wrapped in sushi rice and seaweed." Two pieces for \$5.25.

We order from a cute kid called Jessica, get an iced tea for Hank (\$2) and a coffee for me (\$2). And when the musubis come, there are three (not two) angle-cut tubes of rice-inseaweed with Rolling Stone tongues of Spam sticking out the middle. Plus, Jes-

sica plops down a pot of dark, thick, sweet dipping sauce. Eel sauce, they call it, and man, it's deep and delicious. I let Hank have two of the musubis. I want to save space for ribs and this chicken "kelaguen." Jessica says that's a real Chamorro dish. Has to be. Because who's heard of it? Come to think of it, who's heard of "Chamorro"? Turns out, Chamorro are the people of the Marianas chain of islands (the largest is Guam) who have had to put up with five centuries of Other People coming to tell them how to live.

We take a while to sort out what else we'd like to have. Hank's into Japanese. Me, I want to know more about what's Chamorro on the menu. Ohthe menu has little flags to tell you which dishes are

Hawaiian, Japanese, and Guamanian (the sexy flag of Guam is a curvaceous palm tree on a beach with an outrigger sailing by). Plus smiley faces for dishes they can do as kids' plates.

People at the next table are grazing on a bowl of edamame soy beans (\$4), popping the beans into their mouths from the pod, like peas. Every minute or so, one of the four line-chefs doubledings the bell to tell the waitresses another plate is ready.

The menu's divided up into appetizers, soups,

salads, "da pastas," "da bowls," "kau kau time" (Hawaiian for "eat eat," according to Ellis, one of the management guys), Japanese fried rice, noodles, appetizers, and hand rolls.

The best deal is "da bowls." A "bowl" is a standard dish anywhere in the Pacific, basically a pile of rice with meat and sauce on top. The cheapest, and most popular, Jessica says, is the \$5.95 teriyaki chicken. For a dollar more vou can have terivaki beef or a combo beef-chicken. The chicken katsu don (deep-fried breaded chicken, onion, and egg, over donburi - a sweet soy-based sauce) is also \$6.95. Add two bucks and you can spice any of them up with serrano chile sauce and green onions. "Kau kau" dishes are more elaborate, and more expensive. Up to 17 dollars, but they have plenty of less pricey chicken dishes, like the \$8.25 "huli huli." (Hawaiian, meaning, "turn, turn." Rotisserie, I guess. Hey, is that related to "hula"?) Or \$8.25 chicken skewers ("marinated and grilled on a bamboo skewer topped with Yokozuna's teriyaki sauce").

They have one or two fish offerings — wouldn't you expect more from ocean-surrounded Guam? — like the grilled mackerel with ponzu sauce (\$11.25), plus a \$14.25 Hawaiian combo, with huli huli chicken, kalua pig, macaroni salad, and white rice. I'm told it's worth it for the macaroni. "Mama Mila," who's Filipino and the mom of one of the owners, Gary, apparently puts pineapple, apples, and cheddar in it.

But if you want to sample what the Chamorros eat, there's no contest: the Chamorro combo includes four Guamanian dishes — Uncle Frank's pork ribs, chicken kelaguen, Grandma Rosie's potato salad, and red rice. It's \$14.25. Add three dollars if you want beef or shrimp kelaguen instead of chicken.

Uncle Frank turns out to be one of the founding fathers of

the restaurant. "Everybody goes for his ribs," says Jessica. So I order the combo. Hank orders sushi, an ahi poké (basically tuna in seaweed, \$6.75), a crab hand roll (\$4), and a spicy scallop (\$4).

My order arrives first, a plate of way-big ribs (four), with potato salad and "red" rice — it actually looks orange — and a green-flecked pile of chicken kelaguen. They also have a cucumber salad.

"That came real quick," I say to Hank.

"That's because they know most people are going to order it," he says.

The ribs have a smoky, slightly sweet (and is that lemony?) tang to them. What's delicious is the blackening. (I run across Uncle Frank himself later, and of course, he says that the recipe's a secret. "But it's all worked around garlic, lemon juice, slow cooking.")

The chicken kelaguen is a nice counterbalance. At first taste, you'd swear this was a shrimp ceviche. The chopped-up chicken has green onions, peppers, and shredded coconut, sharp and light against the ribs.

"Okay, this is the other Chamorro thing you've got to add," Jessica says. She slides across a little sauce-pot. "Finadene." She says it "Fee-na-DAY-nay." "National sauce of Guam, and that's official. They put it on everything, just about. But take it easy."

Ho boy. She's right. I dipped the end of a rib in it. Didn't think it helped the rib's flavor, which was good enough on its own, but it burned the heck out of my buccal cavity. I bet that's what Uncle Frank marinates his ribs in. Ellis tells me the sauce is made of lemon juice, peppers, scallions, and soy sauce. You can see Spain in a lot of this. Three hundred years' occupation doesn't disappear without a gastronomic trace. To a probable taro-and-fish diet the Spaniards added hot peppers and corn (from their Mexico territory),

tortillas, for sure, and probably better chickens, domesticated pigs, even rice. And what about this ceviche wannabe, kelaguen? (It tastes even more ceviche-like when I come back a few days later and have the shrimp kelaguen.)

Then there's achiote, the seed of the annatto tree. Very Spanish. That's what makes the rice red — well, orange. It's supposed to add a subtle flavor, but I think color's the big deal here. There's garlic in the mix, too, and I can taste it.

My little burn sent me to the naked rice first, but after a while, adding some *finadene* to it makes the rice interesting. The cucumber salad is a good cooler, too. It's bathed in a vinaigrette. Oh, and "Grandma Rosie's potato salad" tempers everything nicely. I think she's Uncle Frank's wife. I don't taste anything radically Chamorro, but Grandma Rosie knows her stuff. She's put in black olives, pimientos, relish, and egg. It's a meal in itself.

Hank says they don't have any of Guam's famous stews, like *kadon pika*, spicy stewed chicken leg quarters, or the milder *Estafao manok*. But why would he worry? He first came here because of the Japanesesounding name ("Yokozuna's Sushi Bar-" — he blanked on the "& Islander Grill" part). As usual, he's on a sushi search.

He loves the ahi poké, nestled pink in there under the floppy seaweed and sesame seeds, and over sliced, marinated cucumber. Hank then digs into a huge scrumbo pile of "dynamite" green-lip mussels, baked in that weirdly Frenchtasting white sauce the Japanese make. He asked for the hand rolls to be made without rice, to cut down on the carbs, and they obliged with big flutes of pinky chopped-up crab and mixed spicy scallop. "I like it better if they don't chop the meat up," he says. "Then you get its full tenderness and flavor. But this tastes fresh, and they filled the

whole roll with the meat. They didn't have to do that. I'm not complaining."

A big party has filled one of the long tables near Lee Ann Kim's pic. The girls bustle about in their flower-flapping pareus. That's the thing. People look as if they're enjoying themselves. The point is, yes, it's sushi, yes, it's Guam, but most of all it's pan-Pacific, where partying is a way of life and generous servings of whatever is the most important virtue. We're not talking nouvelle cuisine with a micro-dot of food on a big white plate. If you even see the plate here, there's something wrong. I come back a couple more times after this visit. First time, I desperately want try something new but get sucked into that Chamorro combo again, just 'cause of Uncle Frank's addictive ribs.

Next visit, I'm determined to get something for the patient Carla, so I order her kalua pig (Hawaiian all the way, \$9.25) and an "Islander Sampler Platter" (\$10.25), which has two nice, standard lumpia; two empanadas (achiote-stained masa shells filled with a spicy chicken purée); two delicious shrimp patties, with flavors that make you think "kelaguen"; and four teriyaki chicken wings. Pretty good deal for \$10.25.

The kalua pig is smoked and slow-roasted in ti leaf "for eight hours," they promise — different from the Chamorro way of maybe two hours' barbecuing. I think I preferred Uncle Frank's ribs.

The day here, with Hank, I run out of steam, and of space. Hank helps me out with the ribs, and the cucumber salad, and the chicken kelaguen, till even he's sated.

Before we go, I have to ask Ellis: "What does that 'Got pugua?' mean?"

"Pugua's betel nut," he says. "Older people have been chewing it for thousands of years." Seems it's a stimulant. Perks you up like coffee or nicotine. Desserts aren't big here. They could have countless sweet fruits like papayas, guavas, mangos, but there are only cakes. We're too full anyway.

"It's surprisingly familiar food for somewhere so far from, like, everywhere," says Hank. The boy's right. Guam's 2356 miles southeast of Tokyo, 3800 miles west of Hawaii, and a day ahead. Across the dateline. "That's why they say Guam is 'where America's day begins,' " Hank says. He flaps the door shut. "And also why they say: 'Here today, Guam tomorrow.' "

Ooh. How do you top that? "Or," I say, " 'Chamorro's another day.'"

ABOUT YOKOZUNA'S

"Yokozuna's has been going on since November 1999," says Ellis Quenga, Yokozuna's catering coordinator. "Guamanians, all islanders, are very festive people. We love to entertain. If there are only four people, we don't just cook enough for four people. We cook plenty. The owners wanted to create something real [suitable] for parties. The place is owned by two Filipinos, a Mexican, and a Guamanian. Uncle Frank set the flavor. He had many years of entertaining, so with his knowledge, this just kind of fell into place.

"The food here is a lot about Pacific Rim, especially Hawaii. In the beginning they tried to do a little more traditional menu with Guamanian food, adobos and estafaos, and kadon pikas, but it didn't go as well as they'd hoped. So now there are a lot fewer traditional islander [dishes] here. We focus more on the more popular items, the kelaguens, the ribs, the red rice and potato salad. And we have adjusted some things to fit the customers' liking. Like the cucumber salad: we don't usually put a vinaigrette on it in Guam. We usually use a soy sauce. But we don't do that here because a lot

of [other] food items are based on soy. Or kelaguen: It's a form of ceviche. It's supposed to be uncooked, but we can't do that here. And they make a lot more different kinds back home, like with deer meat.

"The most popular dish is the Chamorro combo. It *is* Guam. Nine out of ten go for it. But our teriyaki bowls are popular too. Everyone knows teriyaki chicken and rice."

Why "Yokozuna's"? "It was a name given by the owners. In Japanese it means 'Grand Champion,' among sumo wrestlers. I know a lot of people, when they see the name, and 'sushi bar,' they assume it's a Japanese restaurant. We still get customers who have been living around the corner who didn't realize that we have an extensive menu of islander food. But we're one of a kind, a full-service, sit-down restaurant, versus a lot of other islander restaurants that serve on 'to-go' paper plates. We're not saying this is a four-star restaurant, but as far as fullservice with wait staff, and glass plates, that's how we operate."

I asked him about the role of women in Guam. "They are a very big part of the society there," he said. "The Marianas were taken over by Germany, Japan, Spain, America, so there have been a lot of different influences. We're mixed up, as far as the cultures are concerned. It's a very westernized island. Once the settlers started coming in, Chamorros became the minority. Forty percent. But the women held on to our culture. They passed it on, mother to daughter. And nowadays, it's mandatory for kids K through 12 to take Chamorro classes, so they don't lose their language. So yeah, it's a very Americanized society out there, but we haven't lost ourselves, and men and women have always respected each other. Like, the males will cook. It's not designated 'women only.' "





Saigon Summer

"We never even thought about eating cows before the French."

h-oh. We over-ordered. I sit staring over the steaming rice-noodle pho soup, the mixed greens, the fresh spring rolls, the grilled shrimp on lettuce, the six fried egg rolls, the salty preserved-plum drink with club soda, the two iced teas.

"Well, we can always pile it into a to-go box," I say.

'No way!" says Hank. "Remember the beetroot juice vou tipped on my car's carpet? The beef gravy that leaked out on the front seat? Uh-uh. We eat here.

This was Hank's choice of eatery, of course, his dinero. He's still on his health kick. And right now, for him, Vietnamese is it. He loves the fresh look of the piles of lettuce and mint that always come with the soups. "It just smells healthy," he says.

We wound up here while we were cruising El Cajon Boulevard in Hank's Toyota.

"Say, didn't that used to be an Arby's?" Hank said. He was looking over towards a KFC-type of stand-alone roadside building with a big vertical sign outside. "Pho," it read, and below that, "Ca Dao." "What time is it?" he said.

"Ouarter of three, dude. Lunchtime, and then some, Except I'm, like, Rebecca of Stoney-broke Farm till Friday. Don't 'spose there's any way you could...?

Hank sighs, swings across the avenue, and parks



low Bird" is pumping out over the sound system in Vietnamese. Surprising how many people there are in here at this hour, slurping away at soups, mostly. The waiter comes up. I'm gonna have a pho soup — of some sort. But Hank is

is, the waiter guy doesn't understand a lot of English. "What about egg rolls?" says Hank, thinking

aloud "Egg rolls, fine," says the waiter. Scribble scribble scribble.

"Or spring rolls?" Hank murmurs on.

"Spring rolls. Fine."

Scribble scribble scribble.

"Or maybe some mixed vegetables, bok choy, beans, with, say, shrimp. I don't want noodles or rice," Hank says. "Shrimp, fine."

Scribble scribble.

Result is this banquet fit for a mandarin piled up before us. Hank's dream of mixed veggies with shrimp on the side turns up as grilled shrimp on lettuce (\$4.00). We get the deep-fried egg rolls with sweet-pepper sauce (\$5.40), but also the raw spring rolls (\$3.00), with pink shrimp just visible through the wrap, looking like gestating aliens from Mars.

Me, I got just what I asked for: a pho with beef cooked rare by the hot soup water, and crunchy flank meat (\$4.80). Truth is, all of those different bits of the animal they throw in the pho - like brisket, tendons, tripe - taste the same to me, only more or less gristly. I just like to think of it as a simple beef broth, with a sweet-salty thing, plus little slabs of beef in it, and noodles, some fresh mint, bean sprouts and peppers, and maybe some of that sweet, plummy Hoisin sauce (think it's fermented soy beans) on top. No big deal. Beef soup, right?

"I eat pho for oily lungs," says the lady in the next booth. She's Chinese-Vietnamese, from Cholon, Saigon's Chinatown. "Pho cuts the fats, the oils," she says. "Along with this Chinese tea. Pho and tea. I need them for my health.

Guy on the other side says the whole beef-soup concept is only about 100 years old. "The name pho probably came from the French word feu. meaning 'fire,' as in pot-au-feu, from when they colonized us.²

Plus, it seems, eating beef was introduced by the French. "We never even thought about eating cows before the French," he says. "Cows were our work animals. We loved them. It would be how Americans would feel about eating horses, or dogs."

Huh. I feel more sober about slurping into my pho now. I try a couple of egg rolls in lettuce with sweet ginger sauce and wash 'em down with that salty plum soda. Yes, it's salty, but also rich and sweet, and you can imagine the relief it'd give you in the heat of a Saigon summer. Kind of the mint julep of the East. I only have one of Hank's dee-lish grilled shrimp, while he's polished off both raw spring rolls and their peanut sauce.

We opened in 2001," says Mr. Thong, the owner, when we go to pay up. (Only twenty buckaroos. Not bad, all that food for two of us.) "We had come to the U.S. in 1990. My father died a year after we arrived here, and I was the oldest son. I had to do something that would take care of my sisters and mother. So I went to the City and asked how to open a restaurant. And the City sent this wonderful man, who came and helped me. All the way. I will never forget him and the City of San Diego. They gave me my dream. I called it 'Ca Dao.' It means 'folk song.'

Folk Song Café. Nice. Thong's brother Duke manages this place, and they have opened another in Mira Mesa

'God," Hank says. "So when are we gonna get off our butts and do something?"

'Yeah, man," I say. "Think we need a bit more pho in the belly. Let's come back tomorrow."

left Normal Heights for the wilds of La Mesa back in '99. But I never stopped finding reasons to venture up and down Adams Avenue — the bookstores, the street fairs, a few restaurants and parks, and so on and so on. My

wife was often with me on these little excursions, and you'd be better off asking her just how many times I talked about what I'd like to do with the stately brick building at the corner of Adams and 34th. "Oh, we could put in a bagel shop and a pizza joint and a bakery and a bookstore and [wait for

it...] a wine shop..." It was easy to project my fantasies, because there wasn't much there to get in the way — the building was mostly deserted, save for Rosie O'Grady's bar, and a nasty crack ran through the brickwork on one side. The place was a mess, but oh, that brickwork, and oh, those olde-timey windows....

They waited until I left to start fixing things up. According to Michael Rammelsberg, who, with his wife Barbara, bought Rosie O'Grady's four years ago, "Around 1999 they did the masonry reinforcement. They totally redid the nine apartments upstairs — remodeled, plumbing, wiring. Everything in the building besides us was an office up until about a year ago, and they reinforced all that also." I'm not sure when the sign went up on the place — "Wilkinson Block, circa 1928" — but I'm pretty sure it wasn't there in



my time. (For that matter, neither were the southof-Adams condo conversions.)

Now, Bamboo and Beyond occupies a storefront. Now, the A La Française French Bakery and Café, late of Mission Hills, has opened its

doors along Adams. Now, the Rammelsbergs have "changed the structure of Rosie's, from an older crowd to a younger, more hip crowd. We have live bands on the weekend," along with 24 beers on tap and another 70 in the bottle. Oh, and in back, with frontage along 34th, they have the Propri-

etor's Reserve Wine Bar, open since late last year. "About 30 years ago," says Michael, "that room used to be a TV repair shop. Then it was a sub shop owned by the Italian couple who owned the building." After they retired, "The first owners of Rosie's took it over. Since we've owned it, it's really been a difficult room to get people into, except for maybe overflow during a street fair or St. Patrick's Day."

The solution: offer a different product, attract a different clientele. "My wife's son is a lover of wine, and very knowledgeable. He said, 'Why don't you turn it into a wine bar?' I said, 'I don't think that will work here, but it's not doing anything now, so let's go for it.' We remodeled the room — stripped the walls down to exposed brick, changed the bar to granite." And ever since they put a sign out on Adams and a lighted sign over the door, "It's been very well received. We're probably the smallest wine bar in the world, but it's very comfortable and very cozy. Everybody becomes friendly, and it really enhances the neighborhood. The beautiful part is that if you're on a date, and you want to drink wine and the other person wants a beer or a cocktail, they can buy it in front and bring it back. Or if someone up front wants a really good glass of wine...."

On the night I visited, all 15 seats were full by 8:00 p.m. Two tables were held down by the San Diego Writers' Group, unwinding after a meeting at Lestat's. Manager Gilberto Bravo poured sample

tastes into stemless glasses for newcomers. "I came up with the majority of the list," he said. "I got some of the hot markets, of course - Napa, Sonoma." (I notice a cluster of wines from Harrison and Rosenblum, plus an Arrowood and a Pine Ridge. Some are available by the glass, some — like the Sea Smoke Pinot Noir — by the bottle only.) "But I like to turn people on to alternative whites and reds. Maybe they haven't had a chance to taste a white from the Old World, or a rosé. I have a Picpoul, a Verdejo from Spain. Great summer wines on a hot day. 'You can always drink Chardonnay on the bay, but let's try something else.' I have great luck with them.' (Both wines are higher in acidity than many Chardonnays, and generally dry, giving a strong impression of crispness.)

Bravo met Rammelsberg through his work as a tequila rep — Rosie's carries his Caballo Moro brand. Bravo's brother Guillermo is a longtime wine rep, currently working for Wine Warehouse,

and the two developed a youthful acquaintance with wine into a proper devotion. Proprietor's Reserve "just needed the right person to run it, see it as a wine bar" as well as a retail shop. "The big thing was getting a retail license. You taste it, you like it, you can take it home for retail price."

Bravo never shared Michael's skepticism. "I've been in the area since I started coming to Michael. I've been up and down Adams many times, and I've seen a big change. Condo conversions, a lot of small mom-and-pop restaurants. We knew A La Française was coming. It was just a gut thing — I thought Adams needed a change, some kind of more sophisticated small place...It's beautiful the brick building just gives a lot of character. I've had a lot of patrons come in and say, 'This does not seem like we're on Adams Avenue. It seems like we're tucked away somewhere in San Francisco. It's great.'"

It's the sort of thing you might expect to hear from a neighborhood undergoing turnover. Says



Bravo, "I know that, north of Adams, there are a lot of singlefamily homes, and a lot of younger professionals. They tend to drink wine, and I don't blame them. Wine is here to stay. It's not like a fad, where we'll just have this place open for five or six months. We're here to provide a service. A lot of people that do come are couples - married or dating."

And the response has been strong. The bar is currently open Wednesday through Saturday evenings, but there have been lots of requests from locals for Sunday. "We're doing monthly tastings," said Bravo, "and we get about 25 or 30 people in here. We have appetizers, and we do five wines plus a mystery bottle. Every patron guesses the vintage, the varietal, and the region. They totally get into it." And once, with an '04 Australian Shiraz, two people actually got it right.

NORTH COASTAL

The Armenian Cafe 3126 Carlsbad Boulevard (at Pine), Carlsbad, 760-720-2233. At this large cottage with a year-round heated sundeck overlooking Highway 101, the menu offers Lebanese accent as well as generic Middle Eastern crowd pleasers, including gyros made from scratch. Lamb shish kebab is the house specialty, a "loss leader" featuring tender premium lamb cubes with assertive seasonings, grilled over gas. Even better are distinctive dishes from the owner's family recipes: his mom's Lebanese kibbe (a large, glorified nut-filled lamb meatball) is outstanding, as is her kashta lea dessert an exotic nutmeg sponge cake fragrant with rosewater syrup, topped with pistachios and thickened cream. Dinner platters constitute a full meal, including a great "Armenian salad" and a tasty dip for the meat, along with lessthan-great egg-lemon soup, pilaf, and pita wedges. Wine list is dreary, but corkage fee is reasonable. Three meals daily. Live music and belly dancer Friday and Saturday night. Moderate to slightly expensive. — *N.W.* (8/03)

Armenian specialties cooked with a

California Bistro 7100 Four Seasons Point, Four Seasons Resort Aviara, Carlsbad, 760-603-6868. This restaurant features fresh California cuisine in a beautiful, luxurious hotel dining room. Open 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sun-day to Thursday (to 10:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday). Reserve for the Friday night seafood buffet (5:30 p.m. to 9 p.m.), which includes cooked seafood, sushi, and sashimi. Moderate to expensive. — E.W. (7/00)

Epazote Southwest Restaurant 5 Camino Del Mar, Del Mar Plaza Del Mar, 858-259-9966. The scene is young and lively at this handsome, al-ways-crowded eatery, with seating both indoors and on a patio with a view. The pleasing fare features modern Southwestern-Latino cuisine and a scattering of Pacific Rim flavors. The long appetizer list is a natural for group grazing. Sunday brunch à la carte. Full bar. Open daily, lunch and dinner, with an à la carte Sunday brunch. Moderate to expensive. - N.W. (4/05)

Juanita's Taco Shop Estilo Tepatitlan 290 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-943-9612; also in Vista at 248 Main, 760-758-4531. Enticing aromas of fresh tortillas and fragrant frijoles greet you as you enter this busy little taqueria, where the food's cooked in the style of Tepatitlan a small city near Guadalajara. Its local specialty is *carnitas* — which Juanita's does up (by the plate or by the pound) as tender, non-greasy shreds, served with fresh, cilantro-laden mild tomato salsita. Standard wraps are fine, too, and the beans taste as good as they smell. Try a "Flying Saucer" — it really takes off, with shredded meat, onions mild chiles, beans, sour cream, shredded orange cheese, and puréed gua-camole riding high on an airy crisped flour tortilla. Quick and good, open daily, three meals until 2 a.m. Inexpensive. — N.W. (9/01)

Kealani's 137 West D Street, Encinitas, 760-94-ALOHA. Tucked between a 7-Eleven and a pizzeria, with an ex-

terior sign that says "Saimin" (for Hawaii's version of Top Ramen), this island of the Islands prescribes "Living Da Aloha Spirit." A ukulele player sometimes serenades the noonday crowd at the sidewalk tables, and at any hour the food is "plate lunch" — two scoops of short-grain rice, mild housemade macaroni salad, and a choice of authentic "grines." Don't miss the outstanding kalua pig, zesty, smoky shreds of *imu*-style roast pork, resembling a moister version of Southern "pulled pork." The menu covers the whole panoply of island standards, from *malasadas* (Portuguese donuts) to musubi (Spam sushi), with a Saturday special of a luau's worth of "local food." While you're waiting, check out the droll Hawaiian vocabulary lessons under the glass tops of the tables. Open Monday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. N.W. (10/01)

Milton's Deli Flower Hill Mall, 2660 Via de la Valle, Del Mar, 858-792-2225. This sprawling, family-friendly eatery started out as a non-Kosher Jewish deli, but has come to embrace diner food, pub grub, and Italian and Mexican favorites, along with a full cast of Ashkenazi noshes. Sit down and stuff your-self with stuffed cabbage, overstuffed deli sandwiches, crisp-skinned fat cheese blintzes, *matzoh brei*, hot brisket with latkes — or chicken-fried steak, if that's your bag. Or take out from the attached deli and bakery. The yummy chopped liver will remind you of the Bronx, the smoked whitefish and silky Nova will take you home to Flatbush, but the soft, cottony bagels — *oy!*, so *goy!* Seven days, three meals. Inexpensive to low moderate. - N.W. (4/05)

The Original 101 Diner 552 First Street, Encinitas, 760-753-2123. This is where the caviar crowd from Rancho Santa Fe comes to remember their roots. It's got all the deliberately downhome cooking you could want, in-cluding all-day breakfast ranging from really cheap biscuits and sausage gravy to a pretty cheap top sirloin steak and eggs. For lunch, the bacon-Cheddar burger with fruit is a good surprise combo. The turkey-cranberry salad sandwich is also good, and try the spinach salad, with bacon, feta cheese, olives, mushrooms, and chopped egg. Even though this 101's vintage (1983) in no way compares with the Oceanside 101 Café's (1928), it has become a genuine part of Encinitas life — lines on the weekends will tell you that. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inex-pensive. — E.B. (12/04)

Pamplemousse Grille 514 Via de la Valle, Solana Beach, 858-792-9090. The locals' favorite French provincial restaurant offers exquisite, creative cooking. Favorites from an often-changing menu include white fish served any style, mushroom cappucini soup, and tarte Tatin. Serene atmosphere with excellent service. Dinner reservations urged. Dinner nightly,

Pizza Port 135 North Highway 101 (at Lomas Santa Fe), Solana Beach, 858-481-7332 (Also in Carlshad) "Tasty Grub & Grog," says the sign, and that's just what it is. You come here for three things: the pizzas, the beer, and the scene. The place is cavernous, but the tables are communal, with long wooden benches. Rub shoulders with surfers, students, yuppies, and locals Pizza Port brews their own beer (try Sharkbite Red) and flings their own pizzas, New York style. Filling combos can be great, like the pesto, mesquitegrilled chicken, sun-dried tomatoes, artichoke hearts, and feta ("Pizza Carlsbad"), or shrimp, clams, onions, olives, bell peppers, and mushrooms ("Pizza Solana"). Inexpensive. - E.B. (4/03)

Poseidon 1670 Coast Boulevard (south of 18th Street), Del Mar, 858-755-9345. The two dining rooms and bar here boast airy, stylish decor and ocean views, and the SRO umbrella-shaded patio is right at water's edge. Lunches run to sandwiches, burg-ers, and fried seafood of ordinary competence and uneven preparation: won-derfully coconutty fried shrimp, for example, share a sampler plate with deadly-dry salmon croquettes. Dinner dishes are modern Cal cuisine - that is, a mix-and-match of Pacific Rim-Mediterranean-Mexican flavors, with some emphasis on seafood. But the view's the thing here. Full bar. Open daily, lunch and dinner; breakfast on weekends. Moderate to expensive. -N.W. (4/05)

Roxy Natural Foods Restaurant 517 North Coast Highway 101 (at D Street), Encinitas, 760-436-5001, You don't have to be a Self Realization Fellowship follower to fit in in Encinitas, but it helps. Roxy was made for the veggie crowd who've grown up around the famous seaside compound. These days, that includes surfers, vegans, and even visiting Hollywood stars picky about their food. Actually, it is no longer strictly a vegetarian eatery: the owners have added chicken and fish for Encinitas's "new people" — the carnivores buying up property in the hills. But the vegan-veggie spirit still rules. Most popular item on the menu is owner Shahram Naimi's own invention: the scrumptious Roxy falafelburger. Its green "meat" is made from garbanzo beans, potatoes, onions, cilantro, and

herbs, all bedded down with tomatoes a thick mat of sprouts, and melted cheese, covered by a whole-wheat bun. For chicken-lovers, the garlic chicken pizzas sell big-time. Other healthy treats include the three-egg avocado omelet with toast, the artichoke sandwich (with marinated artichoke hearts), and the squash enchilada din-ner (steamed banana squash with corn, bell peppers, and low-fat cream cheese in a flower tortilla). Payoff? You come out feeling good and full, not bad and bloated. Open daily, brunch through dinner. Inexpensive. - E.B. (5/02)

St. Germain's Cafe 1010 South Coast Highway 101 (at I Street), Encini-tas, 760-753-5411. Despite the Parisian name, the food here is all-American. Omelets are the café's best-known dish — 14 variations of three-eggers (or Eggbeaters by request) served with toast or a muffin, plus tasty herb-strewn "café potatoes" or fresh fruit salad. But don't overlook the Belgian waffles, scrambles pancakes, Louisiana sausages, or the three versions of expertly poached eggs Benedict with genuine hollandaise. Sandwiches run to hearty American classics (including some veg choices), and along with beef burgers, turkey burgers, and veggie burgers, there are no fewer than six twists on lean charbroiled chicken breast on a burger bun. The sheltered patio is always crowded, but there's a large interior dining room with a separate smoothies-and-icecream bar. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (10/01)

Vivace Four Seasons Resort Aviara 7100 Four Seasons Point, Carlsbad, 760-603-3773. If you ever wished to eat like the Medicis did, here's the place for it. This lovely hotel-restaurant at a gorgeous resort showcases Italian haute cuisine which is simpler and more natural than the French equivalent. You'll find inventive combinations of first-class ingredients, skillfully executed and beau tifully presented with none of the culinary clichés of the "mamma mia" joints. Reservations urged. Valet parking free for diners. "Casual-elegant" — no hats, shorts, or tennies — but room may be painfully noisy if patrons get too festive. Dinner seven nights. Four-course tasting dinner a relative bargain, but wine list may blow the budget. Moderate (pastas and risottos) to very expensive. — N.W. (8/03)

When In Rome 1108 South Coast Highway 101 (at Encinitas Boulevard). Encinitas, 760-944-1771. This elegant restaurant offers three dining areas and a menu with outstanding appetizers and pasta dishes. There are many unusual preparations. Gorgeous presentation; warm, friendly service. A winner. Dressy-casual crowd. Dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Expensive. - E.W.

NORTH INLAND

Asia Vous 417 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-747-5000, Chef-owner Riko Bartolomei produces outstandingly inventive Asian-French fusion cuisine, remaking the classics with fresh twists and superb ingredients, includ-ing naturally raised meats and poultry. No one does "fusion" better, and there's not a culinary cliché on the menu: e.g., everybody else's warm goat cheese with beet salad is replaced with goat cheese tempura and braised fen-nel. The inspired combinations include sweetbreads with Chinese sausage, potato gnocchi with lobster and vanilla bean sauce, house-cured hamachi atop a flower-like heirloom tomato man dala, and a Kurobata pork shank treated like French "confit" but lightened by a sprightly salad accompani-ment. Bartolomei's desserts are not only housemade but as brilliant as the earlier courses. The international wine list is adventurous - all this, plus the unpretentious atmosphere and considerate service, too. (But the place can

Casa Reveles Mexican and Seafood Restaurant Harvest Farms Village, 29000 Lilac Road, Val-ley Center, 760-749-8041. (Also at 201 Mission Avenue, Escondido, 760-480-5565, with a Mexican-Italian menu.) "Revels," as the locals pro-nounce it, is probably the best restau-rant in Valley Center proper, offering zesty, careful cooking with some unusually authentic flavors. The Michoacán-style carnitas (available in several "stuffed" dishes as well as an entrée) are outstanding for their moist smokiness, and the house's slightly crunchy fresh-tomatillo version of salsa verde is exciting. Seafood is necessarily frozen (given the inland location), but is handled tenderly. In fact, everything's a good deal better than it has to be, given the lack of neighborhood competition. Definitely worth a stop-off when heading to or from the nearby casinos. Late breakfast through dinner daily. Breakfast specials Saturday and Sunday until noon. 

At first glance, the Grill is what you'd expect — stan-dard strip mall, bare-bones furnishings, office-lunch oriented But the Greek owners give it character with generous but really cheap breakfast dishes like the feta cheese omelets and lunch specials such as luscious Philly cheese steaks. And they're flexible. Want bacon, sausage, *and* ham in your break-fast pita? They'll do all three, same price as with a single meat. As of this writing the day of the three-buck breakfast ain't dead. Not in Sorrento Valley. Breakfast and lunch weekdays. Inexpensive. - E.B. (12/05)

Hacienda de Vega 2608 S. Escondido Boulevard (frontage road along Centre City Parkway), Escondido 760-738-9805. This is a Mexican restaurant with a difference

The setting is a gorgeous restored Old California-style hacienda set on two acres, including a verdant courtyard (complete with fountain) for fairweather dining. The menu is also a leap upward from standard fare. Señora Vega offers authentic Mexican cuisine cooked in the sophisticated manner of Mexico City, her hometown — not border-food compromises. You'll find an array of fresh and interesting appetizers along with a wide choice of serious entrées featuring complex, deli-cious sauces. Each dish is seasoned to the optimum spiciness for its overall flavor — this is not the land of the bland. The Sunday all-you-can-eat brunch offers a whole sampling of goodies brought to your table, with re-fills as desired. Five vegetarian entrées and a kiddie menu available; casual atmosphere. Full bar specializing in margaritas, of course. Open daily, lunch (or brunch) and dinner. -N.W. (9/03)

San Diego Artisan Bakers 1551 S. Escondido Boulevard (at 15th), Escondido, 760-740-5963. This is the closest in San Diego to dining at Berkeley's famed Chez Panisse — but the scenery is prettier. Chef Jeff Jackson's dailychanging menu of California cuisine emphasizes peak, in-season produce and top-quality meats and seafood, cooked to maximize and not disguise their natural flavors. For restaurant food it's relatively healthy, with less fat, salt, and "bad carbs" than most. Some frequently served menu highlights in clude tuna carpaccio, date-marinated Colorado rack of lamb, roasted breast of duck, and dreamy brioche bread pudding. The long California wine list is pricey, but there's plenty by the glass or half-bottle, while cocktail prices are moderate. Reservations essential on weekends. Validated valet parking, free self-parking. Quiet and romantic unless packed. Business-casual to dressy-casual attire. Just south of the Torrey Pines Hilton; look for road-signs to Golf Course and Lodge. Three meals daily. Breakfast and lunches high moderate, dinners very expensive. — N.W. (12/05)

Azul La Jolla 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-9616. The unob-structed ocean view and opulent interior are glamorous. Cuisine is Mediterranean with California influence. Menus change daily. At this excellent traditional steakhouse, the menu includes a variety of appetizers, among them a cocktail of giant shrimp with a spicy, tomatoey sauce and a large, lightly sautéed crab cake with house-made tartar sauce. The wet-aged prime beefsteaks are seasoned with sea salt and pepper and cooked on a gas grill precisely to your order. Bleu cheese, béarnaise and peppercorn sauces are available at extra charge. Non-beef entrées include fish, seafood, veal chop, pork chop, or a delicate Aus-tralian rack of lamb. Unlike many steakhouses where your money buys only the meat, entrées are served with vegetables and potato. Additional à la carte sides include creamed spinach and sautéed mushrooms. Among the house-made desserts the highlights are a light, creamy cheesecake with fresh strawberry sauce and a traditional creme brûlée. The service is attentive. friendly, and knowledgeable, in a masculine setting with dark wood-paneling, dim lighting, and only a moderate noise level. Cigar room off the bar. Open Monday through Saturday. Very expensive. - N.W. (9/02)

George's at the Cove 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-4244. At George's dressy, comfortable downstairs fine-dining restaurant, chef Trey Foshee's superb California cuisine is based on prime ingredients, emphasiz-ing local seafood and produce and cooked to highlight rather than mask

the natural flavors. The menu changes seasonally, so don't miss such treats as squash soup, table-smoked salmon, Sea of Cortez scallops, or wine-braised prime short ribs when available. Reservations necessary. Then you have to decide what to eat from the long Euro-Asian fusion menu, with its vast choice of tapas and sushi options, as well as entrées. At lunch there are several imaginative bento boxes as well as sandwiches and appetizers. Reservations a must at dinner. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Some tapas and sushi rolls are inexpensive, but if you enjoy grazing the bill can mount quickly. Entrées are expensive. -N.W. (3/04)

Sante Ristorante 7811 Herschel Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-1315. The name is Italian for "saint," and the Northern Italian/regional cooking shines here, especially the fish and seafood dishes. Fresh seafood specials are available every night, in addition to those on the menu. Excellent pasta with mushrooms, ravioli with quail, and lamb chops. Separate room for bar; separate private dining room. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner nightly. Enclosed patio for lunch. Not to be missed. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — *E.W.* (4/99)

Tapenade 7612 Fay Avenue, La Jolla. 58-551-7500. This is not only one of the finest restaurants in the county but in the country. Featuring sunny Provencal flavors, famed chef-owner Jean-Michel Diot offers superb seasonal ingredients treated with the consummate ease of a master chef. Among the special joys here are a sophisticated foie gras torchon, luscious free-range veal, and top-quality seafood, with gar-nishes that display an impressive balance of venturesome creativity and rigorous technique. Desserts are worth the calories, matching the style and flair of the earlier courses. And you don't even have to dress to the nines for your firstclass dinner — the sixes will do in the easy bistro atmosphere. Serving lunch (including a moderate two-course prix fixe) and dinner daily, including bargain-priced three-course prix fixe "sun-set dinners." Otherwise, expensive to very expensive, and worth it. -N.W. (9/03)

Zenbu 7660 Fay Avenue (at Kline Street), La Jolla, 858-454-4540. It was a natural for fisherman-restaurateur Matt Rimel to open a sushi bar-fish house, featuring sparkling fresh catch, much of it from his own boats. Sashimi and the simpler sushi are better here than the big party rolls, which can be lunkish Don't miss the sashimi of live local *uni* (sea urchin) served on its shell most weekends. Cooked fish entrées feature equally sparkling seafood, sometimes in almost goofily elaborate preparations. No reservations; 30-minute wait likely on weekends. Sushi bar is up a short staircase; dining room and patio tables are wheelchair accessible. Several vegetarian choices. Full bar, good sake list. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. N.W. 

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Boo Cho Korean Barbecue 7905 Engineer Road (a block east of Con-voy), Kearny Mesa, 858-573-2585. What sets Boo Cho apart from other Korean barbecues is that wood charcoal rather than gas fuels the tabletop grills — proving easier to control as well as lending more flavor. The galbi (short ribs) here are outstanding, with tender meat and a subtly sweet marinade, and the hae mui pa jun (mixed seafood pancake) is moist and light. As at all Korean restaurants, with any dinner vou'll receive numerous small plates of relishes and vegetables (called pan chan), lending a multitude of flavors to the meal. But since Korean dinners are traditionally served all at once, if you want a first-course soup or appetizer, order it separately, and when it arrives, order your main course. (Table room can get skimpy once the grill gets going.) The menu includes three "fam-ily combination dinners" but they're written in Korean; if interested, ask the owner or manager to translate for you. Open Monday through Friday for lunch; daily for dinner. Moderate N.W. (11/03)

China Max 4698 Convoy Street (at Engineer), Kearny Mesa, 858-650-3333. The decor is plain and bright, the sound-level loud, but this is a major resource for authentic Hong Kong cooking — creative and multi-regional, filtered through the refined wizardry of the genuine Cantonese style. The seafood aswim in the live tanks includes such delicacies as black cod (bony but wonderfully sweet), Dungeness crab, and (if you've got the money) abalone — but even inexpensive, homey dishes (e.g., wonton soup, crabmeat cakes) sing with flavor. The exemplary crispy squab and Peking duck must be ordered at least a day in advance, but you'd better call ahead anyway for reservations to avoid a wait at the door. A Pan-Asian community throngs here, for good reason. Lunch weekdays, dinner seven days, with lunch menu returning nightly from 9 p.m. to midnight. Inexpensive to exorbitant, but mainly moderate. – *N.W.* (1/04)

IKEA Restaurant & Cafe 2149 Fenton Parkway, Mission Valley, 619-283-6166, ext.1200. Central shrine for San Diego's 10,000 Swedes, so they say. They come to taste open-faced sandwiches, salmon, shrimp, and meatballs again. This restaurant inside Sweden's wildly successful "home interiors" chain is a great intro to Swedish tastes. The food's more sensible than exciting, of course. But healthy — beef and pork for the meatballs are guaranteed hormone-free. You eat the meatballs with Swedish lingonberry (not cranberry) sauce. Fish is big: the shrimp open-faced sandwich, the salmon plate with potatoes and broccoli, and the Gravad Lox Plate (cured salmon), are always on. And if you want to be disgustingly healthy, chew on their fresh vegetable plate (raw carrot sticks, cauliflower, garbanzo beans, and mushrooms). All for a song. The only health hazard: hordes of babies and kids romping in the restaurant's

mother-friendly play area. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02) Seoul B.B.O. 4344 Convoy Street.

Secul B.B.Q. 4344 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-505-8700. This Korean restaurant means sitting before a sizzling cast-iron grill, sipping hot sake, the smell of grilled beef, grilled onions, and fresh garlic in the air. Try the "Korean B.B.Q." marinated short ribs (*tong galbi*) or thick marbled slices of sirloin (beef *gui*). You'll enjoy all the accompanying dishes that make the meal, like crunchy seaweed salads, radishes in garlicky tomato sauce, slow-cooked potatoes with soy sauce and jalapeño pepper. Feeling adventurous? Go for the goat meat hot pot or Korean steak tartare (*yukhwee*). This is sensual, elemental, hairy-chested food. Lunch and dinner daily. — *M.N.* (*12*/99)

Tropical Star 6163 Balboa Avenue, Clairemont, 858-874-7827. A modest café and grocery offers Puerto Rican and Latin American food and groceries. Very modest surroundings; good authentic inexpensive food. Same menu all day Monday through Saturday; closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — *E.W.* (8/99)

THE BEACHES

The Australian Pub 1014 Grand Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-273-9921. A great place to take your kids after a morning at the beach. This relaxing pub, owned by a true-blue Aussie, offers heaps of good Aussie food. Try the Road Kill (grilled chicken breast with pico de gallo sauce and cheese "run over" between 2 pieces of sourdough) or the Aussie Burger (1/2-pound patty, with a fried egg, cheese, bacon, grilled onions, beets, pineapple, and a side of steak fries). And for an "outback experience," order up Vegemite (a beefy kinda paste) and four slices of bread — it's the Aussie national food, mate. Open Monday through Thursday 11 a.m. to 1 a.m.; Friday 11 a.m. to 2 a.m.; weekends 8 a.m. to 2 a.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (10/01)*

Broken Yolk Cafe 1851 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-270-YOLK (9655). Breakfasting PBers love this place for three reasons: its sundeck, its 26 different four-egg omelets (which you can split with your partner, no extra charge), and the challenge of omelet #27. The dozen-egg "Broken Yolk Café Special" comes stuffed with a mountain of mushrooms, onion, cheese, chili, plus home fries and biscuits. If you can down it in an hour, pay just \$1.98 — you've got huevos. If you can't, the yolk's on you pay around \$17. My advice: split a 4-egger. Open 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (2/04)*

The French Gourmet 960 Turquoise Street, Pacific Beach, 858-488-1725. In the mood for påté, ratatouille, or calf's liver in a homey atmosphere? Make a reservation at The French Gourmet's *toute suite*. Start off with traditionally prepared escargots or mussels. The onion soup is good, but hope that the soup du jour is gingered cream of carrot. Entrées include rack of lamb, veal tenderloin, bouillabaisse, and fish, with several preparation choices for chicken or filet mignon. The pan-roasted halibut is gently enhanced with a champagne *beurre blanc* sauce and topped with crispy braised lecks. Desserts abound, with an imported French cheese plate



topping the list — along with pastries, meringues, etc., all freshly prepared in house. Bakery and breakfast daily; no lunch or dinner Sunday or Monday. Moderate to expensive. - S.M. (9/04) Hancock St. Cafe 3354 Hancock Street, Loma Portal, 619-296-2060. If you spot Marilyn, Elvis, and Lady Liberty waving at you from the sidewalk, you're here. They are life-size fiberglass lookalikes, but Mario is real, and his restaurant is a living shrine to jazz pianist Herbie Hancock. Mario has pianos, guitars, and drums inside - even a little stage where you're often welcome to perform. The food? Italian home cooking. Mario is from New York and knows his pasta. You can usually expect a good-value special, like spaghetti and meatballs. Sometimes he'll even throw in a bottle of red wine. Here among the little factories and auto shops of Loma Portal may be San Diego's most popping cultural phenomenon. Worth investigating, even if you just want to eat. Open daily, 7 a.m.

to 10 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/04) Lamont Street Grill 4445 Lamont Street (between Grand and Garnet), Pacific Beach. 858-270-3060. PB's most romantic restaurant serves California comfort food, punctuated by bold and sometimes strange Mexi/Asian/Cajun flavors, in a rambling converted residence with several rooms and levels. Dinners come with soup or salad, and many entrées are served over marvelous house-made fresh pasta. Salmon over fettuccine in a delicate dill cream sauce is especially fine. The huge array of desserts is house made, too, with something for every palate. The most desirable tables (available first come, first served) are on a lovely fireplace-heated patio. Wheelchair ramp and parking in small lot behind restaurant (call ahead and they'll save you a spot). Homey atmosphere; can get loud. Affordable wine list, full bar. Open daily, dinner only. Moderate. — N.W. (2/03)

Saska's 3768 Mission Boulevard, Mission Beach, 858-488-7311. Venerable, local steak-and-seafood joint that tries harder, from the broth-thin homemade teriyaki sauce (sweet up front, fading to bitter ginger) for the well-cooked (if mild-flavored) fish to the cut-on-thepremises aged beef. The interior's low wood-slat ceilings, driftwood beams, dim light, and red-leather booths combine with the stay-up-late kitchen to make the space feel like a cozy haven, a respite from the brighter buzz of Mission Beach. The wine list runs the gamut from Cook's sparkling wine to Cristal champagne, stopping along the way at an interesting (if expensive) collection of reserves. Next door is the restaurant's serviceable sushi bar (858-488-7255) and

The Third Corner Wine Shop and **Bistro** 2265 Bacon Street, Ocean Beach, 619-223-2700. Ed Moore's casual, loosey-goosey spot, which shares some dishes with his Thee Bungalow across the street, is first of all a wine shop sell-ing most global bottlings for just 20% over wholesale. It's \$5 to pop the cork there if you plunk down at a table among the racks to enjoy casual bistro-style food designed to go with wine. You can snack on goat cheese salad, smoked duck salad, a cheese plate or a pâté plate, or get serious with braised short ribs or duck confit surprisingly paired with spicy Nawlins red beans and rice. No reservations accepted, so best to go at off-hours or you'll wait for a table. Comfortable ounge with fireplace for sipping. Full bar. No corkage charge after 11 p.m., when restaurant staffers drop in for after-work noshing. Lunch and dinner until 1 a.m.; closed Monday. Low-moderate. - N.W. (12/05)

Umi Sushi 2806 Shelter Island Drive (at Shafter, off Scott), Point Loma 619-226-1135. An instant neighborhood success, this large, cheerful sushi bar and dinner house also offers Japanese and Korean entrées, including teppanyaki (cooked in the kitchen, not at the table), Korean ribs, and excellent beef teriyaki of gently grilled prime beef. Sushi highlights include lemony ama ebi, rich garlic tuna, and a "Crazy Boy" roll spicy

enough to divert your palate from the presence of imitation crabmeat. Free parking lot (often full). Special kids' menu available. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner daily. Sushi prices lower than most; entrées inexpensive to moderate. - N.W. (4/03)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Apertivo 3926 30th Street (between University and Lincoln), North Park, 619-297-7799. This wine bar-bistro offers "Italian tapas" of simple Italian classics lightened up and scaled down to medium-size portions — about the size you probably eat at home. All the condiments are on the table, so you can sea-son or cheese your food to taste as you go instead of having a waiter waft them before you've lifted a fork. Good dishes include prosciutto-wrapped shrimp, eggplant rollatini, and for dessert, an airy lemon cheese cake mousse. Parking via alley 1/2-block west. No reservations, but for weeknight large groups, call ahead. Weekends, arrive very early or late or expect a wait. Call-in/take-out food orders okay. Check chalkboard on sidewalk for specials. Plenty for vegetarians and veg-ans. Sound level: roaring. Dinner Tuesday through Sunday (weekends until 11 p.m.). Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (7/05)

Big Kitchen 3003 Grape Street (between 30th Street and Fern Street), South Park, 619-234-5789. This isn't just a restaurant, it's the social center of the universe - and Judy "The Beauty" Forman is its queen. Blame her for the Fern Street Circus, for driving the Miss Cali-fornia beauty pageant out of town, and for disgustingly healthy dishes like Judy's Favorite (spinach, mushrooms, sherry,

and eggs). Our favorite: the avocado, cream cheese, and chives omelet. Vegans fave may be the "veggie option": sautéed spinach, mushrooms, onions, cilantro, brown rice, tofu, and roasted garlic. Her cooks make pretty much everything on the spot, including muffins, waffles, and pancakes. While you're waiting, they always have this "out there" eclectic crowd, plus walls filled with pictures and *bon* mots like "Will Be President For Food." Breakfast and lunch only; closes at 2 p.m. most days. Inexpensive. - E.B. (10/02)

Chicken Pie Shop of San Diego 2633 El Cajon Boulevard, North Park, 619-295-0156. How much do people love this place? Count the chickens lining the walls - ceramic, wood, beaded, painted, even feathered. Hundreds. They're gifts from generations of cus-tomers. Now, as in the 1930s when it started up, the basic chicken pie comes filled with big chunks of chicken meat, doused with white gravy and accompanied by mashed potatoes, veggies, coleslaw, a roll, *and* dessert — like the de-licious pineapple pie — all for one really low price. The menu also offers fried chicken, burgers and steaks, but 90 percent of customers still order that same old chicken pie. Seven days. Cash only. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/01)

Krakatoa 1128 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-230-0272. This used to be an abandoned property. Now the swampgreen clapboard house is the coolest, if (reportedly) ghost-ridden, coffee-eatery ng-outery in Golden Hill. Its garden is lush and tropical, and on its wooden deck laptops unfold, essays get written, relationships get worked out. The menu is light, the names heavy: the breakfast sandwich (scrambled eggs, cheese, fruit) is the Wonchi (an Ethiopian caldera); the roast turkey sandwich with ham, cream cheese, and cranberry sauce is the Ubehebe (a dormant volcano in Death

Valley); the Amboy (a Mojave desert volcano) is a peanut butter, honey, banana, cinnamon, and bacon sandwich. Open 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. (Sundays till 6 p.m.). Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/05)

La Dona 1784 Newton (at Beardsley), Barrio Logan, 619-233-4939. This café is steeped in Mexican history, especially Barrio Logan history. You half expect to see several L.A. Zoot-suitors drift in as you inspect the black-and-white shots of the late actress Maria Felix (Mexico's Marilyn Monroe) or the great photos of the Mexican Revolution that include Za-pata and Pancho Villa. The place has been here for 63 years, and old timers say it reminds them of long-ago cafés in Los Angeles, Modesto, or Madera. The food is home cooking, Mexican style, with meals like scrambled eggs and chorizo with rice and refried beans. Watch out for the pot o' salsa — it's a real jaw-slammer. Other dishes to sample include *chicharrones, menudo,* and *pozole.* Seven days, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/05)

The Linkery 3386 30th Street (at Upas), North Park, 619-255-8778. The artisanal "slow food" cuisine here features local ingredients and made-from-scratch preparations. Despite the name, there's a full menu that includes tasty grilled vegetable appetizers and some fine entrées. But the focus is on the side dishes of fresh sausages made daily onpremises. These vary not only in com-position but in palatability. Good ones include chicken curry, *linguisa*, Polyne-sian pork. Venturesome international wine list at low markups, plus interna-tional beers and Mexican Coca-Cola (better-tasting than U.S. made). Small parking lot (enter by alley on Upas just east of Jack in the Box). Noisy even when nearly empty. No reservations. Lunch and dinner daily, until 11 p.m. Moderate. - N.W. (7/05)

Red Sea Restaurant 4717 University Avenue (at Euclid), City Heights, 619-285-9722. You'll find richly seasoned (and potentially very spicy) Ethiopian cuisine, served communally on a tray lined with a porous pancake, *in-jera*, which looks like an edible dish towel and serves as both an edible spoon and an edible tablecloth. (Use pieces of it to scoop up morsels in your right hand.)

The meat combination platter here isn't nearly as exciting as several of the specialties. The *kitfo* (spicy beef tartare) is very good, the *gored-gored* (meat cubes in spicy butter) is excellent; both are cooked (or not cooked) to your order, and seasoned to your specifications (if you say "hot," expect fire). Vegetables are fine, too; the yellow split peas, espe-cially, sing with flavor. Restrooms not wheelchair-accessible. Vegetarian friendly. Can be noisy on weekend evenings. Open daily. Very inexpensive N.W. (12/00)

South Park Bar and Grill 1946 Fern Street, South Park/Golden Hill, 619-696-0096. A genuine American bistro. This loud, lively, local watering hole serves savory comfort-food to an appreciative neighborhood patronage. Appetizer/bar menu includes excellent rab cakes with house-made tartar sauce, lively red pepper hummus, and a spicy chipotle-dressed shrimp cocktail, etc., plus lots of salads that can double as main dishes. The entrée side of the menu has literally "beefed up" to feature several steak cuts, but you can still get some body's mom's mushy meatloaf (served with BBQ sauce), pork chops, simple fish preparations, chicken *saltimbocca*. Dark, swanky atmosphere, considerate service. Full bar, including international wines at easy prices. Park at edge of Gala lot. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday; bar menu weekends until midnight. Reservations for parties of five or more, or go early if you don't want to wait. Entrées moderate, but appetizers run high. -N.W. (2/06)

Antonio's Hacienda 700 North Johnson Avenue, El Cajon, 619-442-9827. If the décor hasn't been updated from its original 1960s-fabu-lous Old California Spanish, it's because there's been no need. The enormous dark-wood chandeliers, the paddedleather wooden chairs, the chainsaw weathered wood beams - all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, revel-ing in the guitar trio and the exposed

kitchen station - such atmosphere! And the flavors are user-friendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. Excellent Enchiladas Suizas: pale, mush-tender shredded chicken wrapped in tortillas and doused with good, tangy green sauce. Lunch and din-ner daily. Champagne brunch on Sunday, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; all-day buffet Sunday. Inexpensive to low moderate. -A.M.(4/03)

Geno's West Coast Style Barbe-

Toshi Sushi 5943 El Cajon Boulevard College Area, 619-287-3536. Don't ask what's in the "dynamite" sauce (besides the obvious mayo and smelt roe) - it's a house secret, one the restaurant dangles before you in numerous contexts. Try it baked onto the rich, everythinggoes Garbage Roll, where deep-fried shrimp, freshwater eel, and tuna add flavor to the creamy-crunchy interplay of sauce and vegetables. Rolls, both plain and elaborate, abound here. While some can be heavy on the rice and light on the fish, others are triumphs. The Toshi Tempura Special Roll takes battered whitefish and wraps it around the sea weed casing, which is then filled with just-cooked whitefish and a host of garnishes — an exotic-yet-homey fried-fish alternative. The Johnny Roll shows octopus at its most tender, but watch out for spotlight-hogging sweet cream cheese. The simpler sushi can vary - a brilliant, translucent slice of tuna offset by a blander, duller salmon. Japanese entrées are also available. Inexpensive to moderate. — A.M. (4/02)

Valley House Restaurant 10767 Woodside Avenue (at Magnolia), Santee, 619-562-7878. This is for Cornbelt folks, plus wannabes who enjoy plain-speaking, plenty-of-it Iowan food. Take the morning special, "Iowa Breakfast": breaded pork tenderloin, two eggs, and hash browns, fries, or grits, plus a choice of biscuits, muffins, or toast — it's delicious. Lunch or dinnertime you can't go wrong ordering the signature "Iowa Porker" hot sandwich (breaded pork tenderloin in a bun with soup, potato salad, or steak fries) or the "Iowa Beefers" (seasoned ground beef simmered in chicken broth, piled into a burger bun). Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (8/01)

FAR EAST

Bernard's The Mall (way in back), 503 Palm Canyon Drive, Borrego Springs, 760-767-5666. Owner Bernard Hess must be from Alsace, on the French-Ger-man border — who else would offer both frog's legs in garlic sauce and a tasty, credible choucroute garni (sauerkraut and smoked meat casserole, including house-smoked pork chops)? At this local favorite, the space divided between a convivial bar and a dining room with lunch-counter and booth seating, the menu includes German, French, and truck-stop U.S. classics — *schnitzel* side by side with chicken-fried steak. The waitresses know most patrons by name, and the patrons walk in already knowing what they're going to order — mainly the Alsatian specialties. Mediterraneo 1347 Tavern Road (Alpine Creek Shopping Center), Alpine, 619-445-9902. The vibe in this tasteful little trattoria (with adjoining bar) is young, and so is the chef, still slipping new dishes into a menu stuffed with local favorites. The pizzas are outstanding — such a lovely, airy, silken crust! Such wafer-thin rounds of pepperoni! Entrées change with the seasons. Desserts are big and sweet. When the weather's fine, dine on the patio and watch the sun drape light over the piney hills. Daily, lunch and dinner, plus Sunday brunch. Expensive. — A.M. (12/03)

The huge salad bar is surrounded by a groaning U-shaped table laden with everything from peel 'n' eat shrimp to baked cod to Certified Black Angus prime rib. Keep coming back. Bertrand at Mister A's 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel), 12th floor, Banker's Hill, 619-239-1377. Bertrand Hug's airy, open renovation of this formerly "ancient regime" eatery offers a fabled panoramic city view with a casual-chic, highly romantic ambience. Chef Stephane Voitzwinkler's modern French cuisine is a fine fit for the setting, including bistro classics and fresh inventions, emphasizing top-grade seasonal ingredients. A huge, intelligent wine list covers a full range of prices, ages and origins, including "ripe" first-growth Bordeaux. Smoking and fair-weather dining on wraparound terrace/observation deck. Note: parking entrance on Fourth Avenue; wheelchair access via ramp to left of reception desk. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Expensive. — *N.W. (2/04)*

Blue Water Seafood Market and Grill 3667 India Street (at Chalmers), midtown, 619-497-0914. This bright, clean charmer a half-block south of El Indio has a double identity: First, it's a retail fish market; aside from Whole Foods, this is the only restaurant-quality fresh raw seafood south of I-8 and west of City Heights. If you love ovsters, don't miss the big, buttery bivalves here. Second, it serves simple, terrific seafood to eat in or out. Plates are plastic, but don't look for greasy fried stuff. Entrées are grilled gently until perfectly done, topped with your pick of flavors (the lemon-garlic butter is especially tasty) and come with rice and a huge salad with your choice of terrific house-made dressings. If indecisive, ask what's best that day. The overstuffed grilled fish tacos are messy and perfect, with just the right proportions of ingredients. Reachable only by driving north on India. Metered street parking by day. Good choice of beers, a few affordable wines, no corkage for BYOW. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (4/05)

Bombay Exotic Cuisine Of India 3975 Fifth Avenue (between University and Washington), Hillcrest, 619-298-3155. We're talking northern India here, right? That means lots of lamb, potatoes, creamy sauces, tandoor-baked breads, chicken, and less of the south's mouth-scalding heat. At least in its daily buffet, Bombay's a lot less spicy, (though their *sag paneer* — creamy, cheesy spinach — delivered a surprising punch). The buffet includes tandoori chicken, assorted pakoras (lentil-batter fritters), mock duck, chicken tikka, and, if you hit the right day, an addictive mango soup. If you want meat or spicy food, best to order from the menu say, a creamy *tikka masala* with lamb, or long kebabs of minced lamb (kebab curry), or the rich Bombay Coconut Malai. Tell them whether you want it mild, spicy or, for leather-mouths, tikhi. For a cheap, light meal, try a couple of lamb *samosas*. (steep ramp). You'll find upscale, unusual Mexican specialties in an intimate Spanish-style dining room or on a small heated balcony. The menu celebrates three great pre-Hispanic cuisines — Aztec, Mayan, Nahuatl — with discreet admixtures of France, Spain, and Italy. (It's the history of Mexico on a plate.) Among the highlights are the five different Oaxacan moles (plus a sixth from Chiapas), local sea bass in tangy jamaica (hibiscus) sauce, and a unique appetizer, *tlacogos cuitlacoche*, ovals of blue corn masa topped with a sort of "mushroom" that grows on corn ears. (In English it's called "corn smut," but it tastes much nicer than that sounds.) The bar stocks over 600 tequilas and makes a foodfriendly on-the-rocks margarita with fresh fruit juices. El Indio Mexican Restaurant 3695 India Street, midtown, 619-299-0333. El India officer, indiawin, 619-259-6555. Er Indio, "the god of Mexican food," pre-sides over this bustling (expect a line), airy restaurant in an atmosphere of pale blue 1940s solidity. The menu includes the usual suspects (burritos, tacos, etc.), plus slightly less common items (machaca, chile rellenos). Excellent house-made corn tortillas help the standard fare to better approximate the di-vine. So do the sublime core flavors of the meats - the chicken in the taco and the beef in the enchiladas. The carne asada sports a pleasant char, and the beans have a raw-beany intensity. Less heavenly: seasonings (especially paprika and salt) tend toward the heavy side. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive - A.M. (11/01)

El Zarape 4642 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-692-1652. This stylish little Mexican restaurant on a tony stretch of Park Boulevard is proof that not all taco shop food is equal. Try a shredded beef or chicken taco or tostada and you'll know what we mean, with their generous mounds of juicy, slow-cooked meat. Many enjoy their unusual scallop burritos, vegetarian potato-filled burritos and rolled tacos, and well-pre-

pared soups. We go for the stewed meat. El Zarape is dependable, serving Mexican with solid, homemade, handmade flavor. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. -M.N.~(1/00)

Hob Nob Hill 2271 First Avenue (at Juniper Street), Banker's Hill, 619-239-8176. It opened in 1944 as a 14-stool lunch counter. Now, you sweep in under the maroon canopy to shiny red booth seats, deep blue carpet, blond wood, paintings, and a half-wall of wine. You're thinking "business class," but don't be fooled. We're talking coffeeshop prices, especially with the all-day breakfasts and sandwiches, not to men tion the burgers with a salad tossed in. It's across the street from a retirement condo complex and at dinner, says the owner, "We cater to seniors." While there are à la carte choices, affordable three-course prix fixe dinners (with a regular entrée for each day of the week, Mom-style) are the order of the day — e.g., tasty barbe-cued pork on Saturday, roast lamb or turkey Sunday. Open daily. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *E.B.* (10/01)

Islander Grill Embassy Hotel, 3645 Park Boulevard (at Cypress), 619-297-3929. Here's a chance to sample the unique tropical cuisine of Guam, an island at the crossroads of the South Pacific. The cooking includes traces of Mexico, the Philippines, Japan, and Hawaii — all filtered through the spicy Chamorro palate. Try the chicken ke-laguen, a citric salad resembling ceviche, or the brilliant coconut shrimp (available as a starter or entrée). In a chic, creamy dining room below street level you'll enjoy modern eclectic cuisine with French and Mediterranean flavors showcasing premium in-season ingredients, including free-range chicken and pork. No bread unless you pay for it, but you get edamame to nibble while awaiting your order. The global wine list is extensive and expensive; selected bottles are halfprice on Sundays. The full bar features creative cocktails and 20 sakes. Valet parking \$6. Several steps down from street level; disabled access via carport on Fifth Avenue (phone before coming to ensure that entry is open). Open for dinner nightly. Expensive, but an earlybird three-course chef menu is moderate. — N.W. (3/06)

Max's 3000 Fifth Avenue (at Ouince). uptown, 619-298-6445. Max's is the devil, tempting you across Fifth Avenue from Kung Food's health-food heaven. You'll definitely fall from vegan grace with Max's Breakfast Slam Sandwich, stuffed with a wicked sausage patty and three cheeses, or the meatloaf sandwich, or the delicious roast beef Ortega, Visually, the place is no Garden of Eatin', just a gray-and-blue stucco corner lot with a faux-tile roof. So how come passels of lawyers roll up regularly in their BMWs for take-outs? Or to munch, lunch, and number-crunch at the plastic sidewalk tables? Maybe it's Max's awesome American burrito. You sit under eleven poplar trees in a brick patio that has one unusual downtown advantage — except for the wind sifting through the poplars (or a trolley pulling in), it's completely silent here. His daily-changing Euro-Cal bistro menu emphasizes fresh, in-season produce and plenty of slow-cooked comfort foods, prepared honestly from scratch. A "grazing menu" features small bites for folks on a diet or on the run. The menu changes seasonally, but you can trust the kitchen any time of year. Very noisy. Full bar. Dinner nightly, until 11:30 p.m. week ends. Full meals expensive; "grazing" can be moderate. — N.W. (3/06)

Dobson's 956 Broadway Circle, down town, 619-231-6771. This reputable downtown restaurant offers class and comfort, geared for people who enjoy eating well. The food is good, often very

good, as with chicken liver mousse pâté, Mediterranean blue mussels, and, when available, the crude but virtuous softshell crab. Their sweets, such as brownies, are hefty, louche, and cheap. Bring a date to the upstairs dining room. Dobson's is suave, its confidence infectious Lunch and dinner Monday through Friday; dinner only on Saturday. Moderate to expensive. — *M.N. (10/98)*

Fleming's Steak House & Wine **Bar** 380 K Street (at Fourth), Gaslamp, 619-237-1155. Original branch at 8970 University Center Lane, University City/Golden Triangle, 858-535-0078. A steakhouse for ladies who power lunch, an "old girl's" club, or just a happy place where the term "a nice piece of meat" isn't a bad thing? The mahogany of the "old boys" steakhouse genre gives way here to cheery cherry wood. When you get the fried cheese, it's brie, rolled in panko bread crumbs and slivered almonds. And the wine list boasts far more than just burly Cabernets and Bor- over 100 of the far-flung ofdeaux ferings are available by the glass and you can assemble your own three-glass tast-ing flights. Prime steaks are the main event, perfectly cooked and well-sea-soned. Try the Key Lime pie for dessert - custardy and full of limey bite. Valet parking. Dinner nightly. Very expensive. — A.M. (3/04)

George's on Fifth 835 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-0444. This steak-house is in a historic building that was once a hangout of Wyatt Earp — it now boasts faux-Victorian decor and amusing wall art. Formerly Roger's on Fifth, it was owned by former mayor-felon Roger Hedgecock; now Roger's rabbited and left it to his partner George Har-rington. It's still wildly popular with con-ventioneers on expense accounts. The menu offers Prime and ultra-Prime steaks, some of it at jaw-dropping prices - although entrées do include free vegetables. Ask for sauces on the side unless you like them thick and heavy. Some of the best items are nonbeef: the cold seafood appetizers ("lobster mar-

tini," oysters, tuna tartare) and a juicy grilled pork chop. Good range of wines at normal to slightly high markups; full bar. Valet parking; cheaper lot through alley next to restaurant. Dinner nightly. Expensive to extreme. — N.W. (3/04) Harbor House 831 West Harbor Drive, Seaport Village, downtown, 619-232-1141. This two-story Midwesterner-friendly eatery caters mainly to tourist families and conventioneers, but the upstairs Oyster Bar is a pretty spot to chill out and watch the sailboats over a good margarita and a plateful of iced bi valves. Upstairs preparations tend to-ward simple American coastal dishes; the menu includes more appetizers and the drinks include artisan beers. The downstairs main dining room features more old-fashioned "haute" preparations and has a longer wine list but no view. All foods and drinks from both venues are available by request on both floors (but not all servers know this). Parking free with validation for two hours. Reservations strongly advised for after 6:15 p.m. any evening. Accessible via elevator from main dining room, with entrance on the park (south) side of the building. Lunch and dinner daily upstairs; dinner only downstairs. Moderate to expensive. — NW (8/05)

Indigo Grill 1536 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-6802. This second — and much grander — incarnation of Chef Deborah Scott's Indigo Grill expands her original Native American motif, with its focus on root vegetables, game, and roasted spices. Now, the Pacific Coastal cuisine takes in more coast than most. drawing upon ingredients and techniques from Alaska to Oaxaca. (The decor, dark and urban-primitive, follows the theme.) Unexpected combinations are a mainstay; a single dish, such as the seafood *mixto*, may span the entire dis-tance, bringing together a multitude of flavors that work together to create a wondrous whole. Fine breads are made in-house, as are desserts (try the decadent, crispy-creamy plantain cheesecake *flautas*). The wine list includes interesting varietals. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly; closes early Sundays, but open until 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Lunch: inexpensive to moderate; dinner: moderate to expensive. - A.M. (11/02)

La Casita 1247 C Street (at 13th Street), downtown, 619-531-0044. Don't be fooled by the li'l old blue-and-white clapboard house at the bottom of City College's hill. Princes and politicians come to this full-service restaurant to hammer out deals, mix with the Latino (or Anglo) community, and eat some of the best chorizo con huevos (spicy pork sausage with eggs) in town. Fair-weather eaters flock to the spacious garden patio to chow down among the songbirds. In the cozy Mexican-style interior, the pictures on the walls tell you who-all comes here for the good tacos and enchiladas or the delicious pork burritos. Most delicious of all is watching Anglo City-Hallers try-ing valiantly to learn to love the housemade menudo (tripe soup). Lunch delivery anywhere downtown. Open weekdays, breakfast through early dinner; Saturday breakfast and lunch. -E.B. (11/00)

Lou and Mickey's 224 Fifth Avenue (between K and L), Gaslamp, 619-237-4900. The onetime ornate Royale Brasserie across from the Con-vention Center finally had to bow to conventional tastes and simplify into a fifties-style steak-and-seafood house. Kings Seafood is still the owner, so the fish quality remains fine. The fare is simple, with minimal sauce or garnish; veg etables cost extra, coming in large portions but merely adequate preparations. Best dishes include "BBQ Shrimp, Manales' Style," a buttery, spicy New Orleans extravaganza (available as starter or entrée), and the huge, juicy rib-eye "Cow-boy Steak." Valet parking at door. Wraparound heated dining patio. Noisy in dining room near bar; request "Nude Room" for quiet. For interesting wines at good prices, look into "Adventures" sections of the list. Dinner nightly, weekends until 11 p.m. Fish moderate, meats expensive. - N.W. (7/03)

Molly's Marriott Hotel Marina, 333 W. Harbor Drive (at Front Street), North Tower level 1 (sub-lobby level), down town, 619-230-8909. Liberate this restaurant from the conventioneer occu-pation! The old gal has come back to life as a lovely, fresh young thing, thanks to chef Brian Sinnott, arriving from San Francisco's top Italian restaurants. His seasonal cuisine offers clever, creative twists and superb local produce. Pick up a miniature menu at the dining room entrance to remind yourself of what you're eating - you'll appreciate all the more his astute combinations of unexpected ingredients. (Of course, some dishes are tried-and-trite clichés, however nicely prepared - conventioneers, remember?) Try the stuffed squash blossoms, pappardelle with chanterelles, or diver scallops on celery root puree when available. The vegetarian tasting-platter is tempting even to hard-core "carnies." Vast choice of California wines including half-bottles and generous pours by the glass, as well as a full bar. Reserve, even for two, or expect a wait. Free valet parking at hotel front door (Front Street entrance), validated for three hours. Open daily for dinner. Very expensive. -N.W. (12/05)

Napa Valley Grille 502 Horton Plaza, Gaslamp, 619-238-5440. This restaurant at the top of Horton Plaza is staffed by professionals and the food is very good, including the excellent calamari plate. Try the airy, sweet goat cheese cheese-cake for dessert. There is an elegant homeyness to Napa Valley Grille, a comforting, satisfying dining experience. Moderate to expensive. — M.N. (3/00)

Sixth Avenue Bistro 1165 Sixth Ave-Street), downtown (at 619-239-4194. This charming, airy café offers some very credible New Orleansstyle cooking at affordable prices. Among the sandwiches are an outstanding oyster po' boy (with big juicy oysters and good light batter) and a fine, fully-packed approximation of a *muffaletta*, albeit with a kaiser roll standing in for Central Grocery's big, round Italian bread. The

mix-it-yourself jambalaya is tasty, too, even if kielbasa proves a lame substitute for *chaurice* or andouille. Wine and beer. No reservations, breakfast to early dinner (closes 8 p.m.). Inexpensive. N.W. (3/01)

Soleil @K Gaslamp Marriott, 660 K Street (at Sixth), Gaslamp, 619-446-6088. The fare here is simple California cuisine that won't scare the conventioneers, but the outdoor dining patio is a nice spot for a light meal. The spiffy, chrome-detailed interior, with an open kitchen, offers the option of eating with strangers at long tables or booking a large party of your own — but be prepared for noise (even when the room's empty, the music is pumped up party-loud). Starters include a zesty fried calamari salad and crabby crab sticks, and desserts are witty as well as tasty. Entrées are unmemorable. Long international wine list with some "finds," full bar. Service is variable. Validated valet parking. Open daily, three meals. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (9/05)

Azzura Point Loews Coronado Bav Resort, 4000 Coronado Bay Road (Silver Strand Boulevard), Coronado, 619-424-4000 or 619-424-4477. The quietly luxurious dining room with a serene bayfront view is romantic and a bit dressy, but far from stuffy. It's not just for tourists, but a lovely evening's getaway for locals. The California-French cuisine with an occasional Hawaiian touch emphasizes seasonal ingredients in slightly unexpected combinations. Along with a multi-course chef's tasting menu and à la carte dishes, a "sea spa" dinner showcases fresh seafoods in healthful preparations. A good wine list at reasonable markups is strong on half-bottles. Free valet parking at the porte cochere of the main lobby. Dinner Tuesday through

The dinner menu here has California's typical dumbed-down world-appetizer array, plus salads, pas tas, grilled meats, a few sautée items and children's plates. The restaurant is very family-friendly (full o' kids, actually), with a menu that appeals to the young in mouth: The chef seems to have a sweet tooth, since almost every dish involves honey or sugar — for example, the table butter that's intriguingly flavored with a honey-basil mixture. Your server will tell you about the day's fresh-fish selections, which are more attuned to adult palates with fresh, fine-quality seafood done simply and well. Ultra-noisy inside when crowded; reserve for the lovely terrace with a view of the beach. Open daily, lunch and dinner, with weekend break fast. Moderate to slightly expensive. -N.W. (8/01)

Crown Room Hotel Del Coronado, 1500 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-6611. Let's face it, this is one of the grandest entrances you'll make any where, into the enormous, gloomy, vaulted timber dining room where presidents, princes and Marilyn Monroe have chowed down. It's only open for Sunday brunch these days. The gigantic eat-till-vou're-beat buffet feast ranges from made-as-you-watch omelets to salmon, crab legs, prime rib, dizzving desserts, and even long-stemmed straw berries you hand-dip in chocolate. The downside? Monroe was here to shoot

It's either cold (like the croissants, though the chocolate chunk ones are delicious) or luke-warm (like prime rib and eggs Benedict — and those eggs could do with a lot more Benedict). But this is an Edwardian-scale social occasion - see and be seen. The food isn't great, but the atmosphere is grand. Sunday, 9 a.m to 2 p.m. Expensive. — E.B. (9/03)

L'Escale Coronado Marriott Island Resort, 2000 Second Street, Coronado, 619-435-3000. Probably the pink flamin gos and bay views bring you here first. But L'Escale ("Port of Call" in French) delivers to the taste buds too. For "Northern Mediterranean cuisine with California flair," read lots of pasta, fish salads, sandwiches. Try the grilled salmon nicoise salad with its richly sauced fish, crunchy green beans, red potatoes strong olives, and rosemary-flavored bun. Entrées like grilled chicken and mushrooms in Parmesan cream with penne pasta are safe enough. Or bone-in filet mignon with black pepper zinfandel sauce. But for sheer architecture check out the tuna salad sandwich wrapped in lavosh: three vertical Armenian bread tubes, angle-sliced to reveal interiors of tuna and greenery. Eat on the pool and bay-surrounded patio if you can. Breakfast, lunch, dinner Moderate to expensive. — *E.B. (2/03)*

Spiro's Gyros Ferry Landing, 1201 First Street #4, Coronado, 619-435-1225. The food, the music, the view - are we outside Athens? Is this the Aegean? This inside-outside Greek café is located at the water's edge, and the heated patio has a spectacular view of San Diego, the bay, and the boat traffic. At sunset, sipping their excellent Greek wine (cheaper than their California), watch the sun set the city ablaze in gold. The prices keep Spiro's popular with the locals as well as

tourists. Try the moussaka (eggplant casserole) or the souvlaki chicken, marinated in tzatziki sauce, served with tomatoes, onions, and pita bread. Open seven days until 8 p.m. Inexpensive E.B. (11/00)

Tango Grille Argentine Steak House 635 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-0384. Play gaucho and enjoy the most authentic Argentine parrillada (mixed grill) in town at this charming, warmly decorated bistro about two min utes from the Chula Vista Shopping Center. Fine, smoky wood-grilled Colorado beef appears in several unusual cuts (including succulent steak-cut short-ribs). You can choose from two different mixed grills (sized for one or two), the first with conventional meats, the other - the more adventurous includes organ meats and blood sausage. For starters, there are brilliantly seasoned mini-empanadas of amazing lightness, as well as several interesting salads. Those not in a grilled-meat mood can opt for numerous pastas (including a big, meaty lasagna) or the ubiquitous milanesa (breaded beef or chicken patties) of the pampas. Portions are more than generous, and so are the flavors. Open daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/02)

Village Pizzeria 1206 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-522-0449. In the back, Mootime Creamery makes all its ice cream. In the front, Mootime owner David Spatafore decided to set up what he's always wanted: A cheap, back-east Italian, red-and-white-tablecloth, dan gling Chianti bottle eatery where local families and amateur sports teams can come in and pig out. He wisely didn't destroy what was half of the famous old Mexican Village. Instant atmosphere! Ancient murals of guys with guitars ser-enading señoritas, arches, illuminated clusters of red grapes. The bad news: You might have to handle pumped-up kids' sports teams cramming the booths around you. The good news: Great calzones and pizza by the slice. Open lunch through dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. – E.B. (12/04)

BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number.

D'Stefano Pizza Restaurant Carrillo Puerto #7835 (at 3rd Street), between Martinez (D Avenue) and Mutualismo (E Avenue), three blocks west of Avenida Revolución, 638-4309. Evening around nine is the best time to come when groups are in here carousing with *tarros* and pizza. *Tarros* are giant mugs that hold *caguamas* (large "sea turtle" bottles) of Tecate beer. There's plenty of good standard Italian food to go along with it. You can pay a little — for basic dishes like spaghetti or lasagna — or up to around twenty dollars for a "gigantic" pizza. Inexpensive. Midday to mid-night, seven days. — *E.B.* (2/04)

El Cid Lopez Mateos #993 (just off Blancarte), Ensenada, Baja, 646-178-1809. This restaurant is at the heart of the tourist district, but the cooking and service are way above coach class. Look to the "Specialties" section of the huge menu for the most interesting selections. Crisp quail with rose petal sauce (famed from *Like Water for Chocolate*) proves outrageously delicious, and the seasonal chiles en nogada (meat-stuffed poblano chiles with walnut-cream and pomegranate) gain refinement from reaseless ground sirloin. Fish dishes are fresh, rich, and tender, and you'll find nine different ways to enjoy a steak. If you can handle a tableside production number, crêpes with cajeta (caramel sauce) makes a very grand finale. Fully bilingual staff; English menus available. Sidewalk patio dining available. Reserve for weekends during tourist peaks. Full bar, with excellent margaritas, Baja wines. Open daily, continuous service breakfast through dinner. Moderate. N.W. (4/03)

El Galeon (Puerto Nuevo) One street before you reach the oceanside street market, one block south of Calle Entrada (the entry road), and two doors north of Calle Salida (the exit road), Puerto Nuevo. This is a lively, comfortable spot with a good ocean view for scarfing down Puerto Nuevo lobsters or other local fish or seafood, including whole fishes cooked to order at a bargain price. Downstairs boasts an open

kitchen and a cozy bar with a partial sea view. Upstairs there's a breezy terrace with a full sea view. The jokey staff speaks excellent East L.A. English, and the cooking is decent - for instance, the melted substance served with the lobsters is about half real butter, half the ghastly lo-cal Kitchen Maid "spread." Bilingual menu and staff. Full, extensive bar. No reservations, cash only. Three meals daily. Low moderate. - N.W. (10/02) La Espadana Avenida Sánchez Taboada #10813, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-1488 or 634-1489. If you learn only one word of Spanish, learn this one: Bor

rego. Because this place does the greatest oven-cooked leg of lamb ever. The meat tastes as if it was cooked in wine, garlic and herbs, but the owners insist it's just Tecate lamb baked slowly in its own juices with a bit of oregano. But most folks come here for beef - steaks and the popular beef fillet, sizzled at a big flameand-smoke display counter BBQ grill. All terra-cotta and timber, this is where the local middle classes come for their cross-border food fix. Think Tijuana's version of Mission Valley. Still, it's charming, and you can have fun. For instance, don't forget to ask them to ring the bells set in their *espadañas* (holes cut in the Mission frontage) above the great arched wooden entrance door; they clank tunelessly, but they're great for cel-ebrating your 21st birthday, mom getting her degree — whatever. Open for breakfast, lunch, dinner, seven days. Moderate. — E.B. (11/04)

Mr. Fish Blvd. Agua Caliente #6000, Tijuana, 686-3603 Also at City Hall. Palacio Municipal (at Paseo del Centenario and Avenida Iosefa Ortiz de Dominguez), Río District, Tijuana, 682-8020. The sign is showing its age and the concept (exotic middle-class restaurant in the middle of a parking lot) seems dated, but two-decade-old Mr. Fish is still serving good fish food. Ask for the Spanish-language menu if you can handle it - it's far more extensive than its poor English cousin. Sit outside under the palm thatch if weather permits. All the basic dishes are good, like octopus in white wine, Lucifer's Oysters with white sauce and smoky chipotle chiles, or the Mr. Fish Combination: half a lobster, fish, shrimp, and calamari. Probably the most popular gringo choice is mahi mahi in lemon-pepper sauce, but consider ordering with salsa eneldo - dill sauce. Also interesting: seafood fettuccine "a la Gorvachov" (with vodka) and anything (such as the lobster Mr. Fish or thermi dor) with the signature salsa blanca. It'll remind you of something (could it be Rubio's?). Open 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days. Moderate. - E.B. (12/04)

Rica Torta Niños Héroes Avenida #890, between 2nd and 3rd Streets (opposite Dorian's department store), Ti-juana, 685-8579. This café may have the best tortas (call them Mexican-style hamburgers) in Tijuana. Six-inch rashers of marinated carne asada, slices of ham, squares of cheese, chopped salad, tomato slices, fresh-scooped avocado...it's a double-wide, double-high burger. The menu has 16 different kinds of tortas, from chorizo with eggs to beefsteak ranchero, all served in huge, threeribbed, crisp-toasted Mexican bread buns. There's other stuff, but to a burger buff, one of these is quite enough. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/01) Vallarta 1252 Boulevard Agua Caliente (just before El Toreo de Tijuana), 686-1560. Maybe the only smoke-free restaurant in Tijuana, this vegetarian haven was started in 1996 by health-conscious Doctor Georgina Vallarta de Alcántar. They make their own yogurt, soy hash, breads, rolls, salsas - and "meats" like a veal from their own wheat gluten daily. You sit at wood tables and chairs next to blue-framed yellow walls splattered with Talavera ceramic suns. At breakfast, try the tartaleta vallarta, a mix of eggs, spinach, mushrooms, onions, and chile. For lunch (and it's usually busiest around three), their excellent soup, caldo tlalpeño, packed with cheese, rice, avocado, and chile, will fill you nicely. The soy hamburguesa is good, but go for the *torta*, which has that gluten milanesa along with cheese, avocado, and jalapeño. Good organic coffee. Wonderful juices, especially the cactus - if you need cleaning out. Open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/06)

Oggi's At least ten branches all over the irbs; see phone book for the nearest one. Is it the pizzas or is it the housemade brewskis (six ales, one lager, one stout) that make Oggi's so popular? Is it the sports-bar ambiance (with multiple video screens) or just the near-ubiquity of branches that has won this chain nu-merous "best pizza" citations? The pizzas are American-style, with thick, slightly sweet crusts, many with elaborate toppings that sound more adventurous than they taste. (All the cheese alternatives are equally mild.) The menu also offers pub snacks, decent soups and salads, hearty sandwiches, and American-Italian entrées so malladapted that no mamma mia in Bensonhurst or North Beach would even recognize them. Full bar, lunch and dinner daily at most branches; free local delivery with minimum order. Inexpensive. -N.W. (7/04)

Sammy's Woodfired Pizza It's not Italian or New York pizza, it's...San Diego pizza! The crusts are Californian: thick and slightly sweet. The toppings range from ordinary to exotic. St. Tropez If you love continental breakfast, these bright cafés with indooroutdoor seating offer scores of housebaked pastries (including brioche) and good coffee. Parisian-style brunch/lunch choices embrace *croque monsieur* and *croque madame* (grilled ham and cheese sandwiches, topped with either light cream sauce or an egg), crêpes, quiche onion soup gratinée, or chicken-filled puff-pastry. Omelets are rather weighty. Some of the sandwiches offer Mediterranean flavors - try a pan bagnat (salade nicoise on a baguette) or one of the grilled panini. Desserts range from cookies on up to elaborate cakes. Beer and wine. Open daily, breakfast to early dinner. Inexpensive. a writer after all. Or maybe, as Stephen Greenblatt claims in *Will in the World*, Shakespeare was adept at erasing motives, at extinguishing the light at the end of the tunnel.

Greenblatt calls this deliberate blurring "strategic opacity." It helps explain why Iago's so unfathomable. He says he wants to ruin Othello because the Moor may have dallied " 'twixt my sheets" with Iago's wife. Othello also chose inexperienced Cassio lieutenant instead of the veteran Iago. Later Iago says he loved Desdemona, kindasorta. These causes even taken together don't account for Iago's infinite malevolence. At committing evil, he's a first-ballot hall-of-famer. Iago wants to make "suspicion" equal

Iago wants to make "suspicion" equal "surety" — mere doubt being evidence enough for action. According to Ron Suskind's *One Percent Doctrine*, Iago's approach mirrors current U.S. policy: "If there's just a one percent chance of the unimaginable coming true," say the powers that be, "act as if it's a certainty," and evidence be damned. Suskind also calls this policy the "Cheney Doctrine." Iago uses such a "low probability/high impact" event on Othello.

Iago's a monster. Even so, he shouldn't be played as a mustache-tweaker or pitchfork-toting gargoyle. He may be Shakespeare's best actor, in fact. To find out why Denmark is "rotten," Hamlet dons an "antic disposition" (all told, the Danish politicos may be better theater critics than Iago's Venetians, since Polonius and King Claudius both suspect Hamlet's up to something). Instead of Hamlet's feigned madness, Iago adopts a guise of "love and duty" so well that Othello's convinced he's honest.

The only irksome performance in an otherwise smartly staged *Othello* at the Old Globe: Karl Kenzler runs Iago all over the map. At first he's a frat-brother/prankster, with Monty Pythonesque fillips: wink-wink, nudge-nudge. Throughout he's a speed freak (as if Othello's misery were Iago's drug of choice). Kenzler's too facile in a role that requires some effort at dismantling the Moor,

> some surprise that his schemes succeed. To his credit, Kenzler is consistent, detailed, and quite funny. But when Iago ceases being "opaque" and reveals himself

to be a "demi devil," Kenzler goes cartoony evil: a Halloween goblin's fake wicked laugh and beady eyes. The depths are never there.

Which raises the question: how could this guy have duped Othello? Kenzler's glib choices make Jonathan Peck's Moor less noble. Not that Peck skimps anywhere. One of the tests of an Othello comes early. Act One, Scene Three, gives him miles of exposition: his life story, why he requires "ocular proof," why he married Desdemona. Trusting, open, he even explains that his sexual urges have waned ("the young affects [desires] in me defunct"). With a sonorous voice that doesn't need the mike he wears above his right ear — for unclear reasons, the entire cast is miked — Peck turns the speeches into a spellbinding tour. He not only reveals humility, pride, and honesty, he describes Othello's steady rise up Fortune's Ferris wheel. Except for a vile racism that tightens around him with each new scene, the Moor pretty much has it all. Peck convinces that he's earned it. And, Othello demonstrates, Fortune's wheel can spin it away in a heartbeat.

"Have you prayed tonight, Desdemona?" one of Shakespeare's most chilling lines, in the Jesse Berger-directed production's best scene. When it dawns on Julie Jesneck's Desdemona that her husband wants to murder her, she fights back as best she can. Throughout Jesneck gives Desdemona a freedom most lack: liberated from her father's influence, married to the man she loves; and whether or not they've consummated — a question in many commentators' minds — she enjoys her status in a world newly opened to her.

As Jesneck pleads for life, it's as if Desdemona becomes even more innocent, more loving. Peck matches this urgency with a final metamorpho-

sis. He's the warrior denied battle up to now (since the entire Turkish fleet sank on his way to Cyprus) and stopped two swordfights. The clash of the guiltless bride and the stone-hearted Moor is at once primal, infuriating beyond belief — because this should *not* be happening! — and deeply moving.

Dressed in Elizabethan garb, including white circular collars that make the men look like John

the Baptist's head on a plate, the supporting cast does quality work. Michael A. Newcomer's Cassio's appropriately two-faced: a Renaissance courtier to Desdemona; a sexist pig to his courtesan, Bianca. Michael Urie stuffs Roderigo with more business than the role can handle but gets comic mileage along the way. As Iago's wife Emilia, Cileste Ciulla goes in opposite directions at the same time: the angrier she gets, the more she be-





comes the play's ill-starred raisonneur.

It's almost a local tradition to make the Chorus in Greek tragedies marble orchard-stiff. For 6th@Penn's impressive Iphigenia at Aulis, they're the most supportive, fluid, and mesmerizing I've ever seen.

Five young women seem to grow out of the stage. Mounds evolve into faceless, leper-like beings huddled together. They slowly become people, then representatives of public opinion, commenting on the scene, even helping one when she can't pronounce a tricky name. Then they sing Leigh Scarritt's eerie music - steep, note-tonote intervals — with such polish they elevate the entire production several notches.

The women are tourists from Chalcis - war groupies, almost, come to Aulis to see the Greek heroes on their way to Troy. The fleet could remain there for some time, since the goddess Artemis stopped the winds. Calchas, the prophet who predicted the Trojan War would take many years, says general Agamemnon offended her. She wants his daughter sacrificed. Iphigenia must die, or the thousand ships won't sail.

"Some god has driven Greece mad," says Ruff Yea-

ger's emotionally shredded Agamemnon. Either that, or they've placed far too much faith in the words of an enterprising seer. And is Iphigenia a Ioan of Arc or the dupe of warrior-dominant rhetoric?

The chorus and Michelle Cabinian's innocent Iphigenia make the production worth seeing. But there's much more. Director/costume designer Douglas Lay puts the Greeks in a modern war camp: camouflage netting surrounds the audience; when a helicopter lands, you'll duck to avoid its blades. Along with two kids playing catch with a hand grenade, Lay's encouraged bold choices throughout, including a splendid performance by Robin Christ. Her Clytemnestra reveals Agamemnon's cold-blooded killer inside the loving Mycenaean queen.

Moses Hadas called Iphigenia the "last Greek tragedy." It was Euripides' final play. Posthumously produced, its elements are much more integrated than the old form allowed. And given its analysis of wars and motives and the human costs of each, it couldn't be more contemporary.

I want to plug this enterprise sight unseen. The Actors Alliance Festival offers local directors, actors, designers, and playwrights the chance to showcase themselves in new or rarely produced work. The actors perform on a bare stage, or with few props, against a black background. Costumes range from off the rack to off one's clothes-hanger (or floor). The emphasis is on the actor. Each evening of the festival includes three or four one-acts. Not every one will be a showstopper. Some get chosen for juicy roles rather than telling a good story or making a dramatic point. But the percentage of quality work is often high. And every now and then you find a jewel.

Worth a try.

Don't worry about hurting anyone's feelings, Ruth Steiner, the famous writer, tells her grad studentprotégé Lisa. "You have to get in there and shoot." Steiner also warns Lisa that if you tell a story out loud you won't write it (Ruth talks so tough, it's easy to forget she also said, "Some things you don't touch"). Like writerly karma, both pieces of advice boomerang Ruth in Donald Margulies's uneven drama (about two-thirds didactic Creative Writing 1A writ large and one-third dramatic). The script has gaps, big ones. But Kandis Chappell fills them in a riveting performance. Ruth, who was most alive over 30 years ago, now faces mortality: both literary and human. Chappell's like an atlas of roads taken and not, superimposed on each other. In six scenes, spanning six years, Chappell becomes haunted by both. As Lisa, rocketed into instant stardom, Amanda Sitton's rising arc matches Ruth's tailspin. She's on her way (now shooting first and handling questions later). But - given Ruth's experience and the play's subtext about fame's imprisonment --- to where? Under David Ellenstein's unfussy direction, they perform on Marty Burnett's detailed set, which looks as if Ruth hasn't changed anything since she moved into the Greenwich Village apartment 31 years

Worth a try.



Mother Courage

No play, this minute, is more rele-vant than *Mother Courage*, which illustrates Bertolt Brecht's thesis that "war is the continuation of business by other means." The 1941 drama shocked audiences when first produced. But even though what it says about the business of war defines our era, the La Jolla Playhouse's staging, with a few vivid exceptions, is surprisingly bland and everyday. Anna Fierling, called "Mother Courage" for an unheroic act, is the Kellogg, Brown, and Root of the Thirty Years War. She and her three children sell food to the cannon fodder of the wealthy. The production uses famous - and now-familiar -Brechtian techniques (no acted emotion, no illusions, non sequitur collages of music, burlesque, and dance) but lacks spirit. It's a far cry from the wake-up call the author wanted. In her opening-night per-

Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terrible Turks mangled defrocked priests, while mums and dads yelled insults and grannies waved their handbags"). National Comedy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic director Garv Kramer savs the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a challenge match against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledge failure, abundantly, then forget it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian.

Worth a try.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but the "game show" — on Fridays — is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" — two pairs of players competed, taking sugges tions from the audience; and "Go-rilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four

as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, wrote one of the very best books I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art."

Worth a try.





kay, Hollywood. Just keep them coming. Keep sending me stuff like You, Me and Dupree, like Little Man, like Click, like Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest, like The Fast and the Furious: Tokyo Drift,

like Garfield: A Tale of Two Kitties, like Waist Deep. Keep giving me no choice. See if I care.

See what comes of it. And you too, Landmark. Keep offering me, by way of an Alternative Cinema, the likes of Wassup Rockers and Strangers with Candy and A Scanner Darkly and The Road to Guantanamo and The King and Cavite and The Mostly Unfabulous Social Life of Ethan Green. And you'll turn me into a DVD reviewer sooner rather than later. You'll force me to watch things I actually want to see. (What a notion.) You'll push me to the point of view of moviegoers who choose no longer to go to the movies but opt instead for takeout. Why choose from a menu of a couple of dozen items when you can choose from thousands?

On the second straight week of summer doldrums, my selection (at the indispensable Kensington Video) was Eric Rohmer's *Triple Agent*. A pity that it should come to this. Resnais, Godard, Chabrol, Lelouch, all of his surviving contemporaries, have had to become accustomed to snubs from American film importers, but Rohmer without fail has continued to receive

invitations, right up through his seventies and into his eighties: his Indian summery *Autumn Tale* and his

experimental dabble in digital video and CGI, The Lady and the Duke. The open-door policy in his instance was always something of a puzzle, in that his name is a virtual byword for talky, static, actionless cinema. (So much so that Gene Hackman's private eye in Night Moves, a full three decades ago, likened the experience to "watching paint dry.") The closed door, the slammed door, in the face of his new Triple Agent, after all this time, is no less of a puzzle. The subject matter of entre-les-guerres espionage among post-revolutionary Russians in exile in France at least *sounds* more com-mercial, more "exciting," more "thrilling," than his norm. But I would have to see for myself. I would simply have to see it on a small screen.

(Perhaps, as an aside, I ought to



be more put out about the snubs to Godard. Kensington's shelves are littered with films of his that I would have dutifully attended in theaters — *Passion, Detective, New Wave, Oh Woe Is Me, Forever Mozart* — yet I can't seem to bring myself to pick one of these for pleasure. My education cannot be left entirely in my own hands.) No real surprise, *Triple Agent* proves to be no more exciting or thrilling, no less talky and static. While that makes it nothing unusual for Rohmer, it does make it something unusual for espionage. Something of an anti-spy film. (A period piece, on the other hand, is not unprecedented for Rohmer, but is still unusual, and a 20th-century period piece is over a century closer to present-day than either *The Lady and the Duke* or *The Marquise of O.*) Together with Chabrol, Rohmer was the co-author of a cornerstone study of Hitchcock, *circa* 1957, though unlike Chabrol he has never himself been a mimicker of the Master. Just because he is suddenly consorting with spies,

he is not about to start now. Where Hitchcock gives us Cary Grant and Ingrid Bergman, James Stewart and Doris Day, Paul Newman and Julie Andrews, Rohmer gives us uncharismatic unknowns, Serge Renko and Katerina Didaskalou. Where Hitchcock pushes the underlying politics into the background, Rohmer pushes them to the fore. Where Hitchcock is always scheming of camera angles and movement, Rohmer is transfixed by words. Where Hitchcock permits nothing to impede his pace, Rohmer pauses for illustration and instruction. Where Hitchcock will sacrifice complexity for clarity, Rohmer cultivates confusion. And where Hitchcock ties things up in a neat little bow, Rohmer refuses to fall back on the license of fiction in order to offer a solution to an Unsolved Mystery.

Much of the confusion of Triple Agent is inherent in the subject matter, a factual case centered around a former White Russian general, relocated in Paris at the head of the Russian Army Veterans Association, nurturing a network of shadowy contacts from Moscow to Berlin. It was clearly a confusing time. The rising French communists, in perfect opposition to the sinking Russian expatriates, saw eye to eye with Stalin on politics, but not on art. And they were in no hurry for their own revolution, with Hitler installed across one border and Franco settling in across another. Stalin and Hitler, meantime, the strangest of bedfellows, might prove useful to one another for as long as they could post-pone their showdown. Interspersed newsreels from the period keep us abreast of major developments. But only if you majored in Modern European History will you feel completely comfortable with the talk of opposed factions, mixed sympathies, tangled alliances. The talk, as always with Rohmer, is civilized and fluid, yet at the same time very dry, even desiccated. (Maybe "fluid" wasn't the right word. Maybe "windy.") The protagonist at the heart of the affaire is "a bit of a chatterbox," in the assessment of his apolitical Greek wife, an oldfashioned genre painter to the Russian taste rather than the French. Because Rohmer never announces his spies as spies, never introduces them with calling cards, we must listen intently to every conversation with an ear for Loose Lips: "You say a lot of things to strangers you never say to your wife." (Is the upstairs communist just shooting the breeze or is he panning for gold? Can the cab-driving Russian prince be trusted with the straight poop? Is the offer of a free-of-charge house in the suburbs too good to be true?) The confusion, the incomprehension, is inherent as well in the largely domestic scope of the action - the cloak-and-daggery kept discreetly offscreen - and wifely point of view: "I was only half listening. I prefer not to know too much.'

It is good to be able to report that the digital-video experiment is behind us, and that the 35mm image is sharp, bright, rich, and beautiful. A preludial title card on the DVD assures us, in addition, that the full-screen aspect ratio of 1.33:1 was expressly dictated by the director, presumably in conformance with the standard aspect ratio of the Thirties. (He also tosses in an antiquated iris-in and iris-out at one point, a gimmick seldom seen on screen since the death of his contemporary, a fellow Hitchcock fan and a capricious antiquarian, François Truffaut.) The collection of cars, dresses, telephones, radios, coffeepots,

and whatnot, is impressive and enjoyable in a museumy sort of way. And if the film is not remotely exciting or thrilling — no "if" about it, really it is nevertheless interesting (devaluated word) and involving. And if, finally, I cannot truthfully say I found it as entertaining as *Nacho Libre*, for example, or *The Lake House*, that's not quite the point. The point is, to go back to where we started, I actually wanted to see it. A rarer thing these days than mere entertainment.




Mr. Glib, comes across as too insouciant to be truly involved, and in order to convey a scintilla of commitment he must resort to the devices of Burt Lancaster as pointed out by Vincent Canby: he "acts with his hair." Or in Vaughn's case, his hairpieces, sporting a mild approximation of a 1950s rockand-roller's pompadour for special occasions but favoring otherwise something resembling a scoop of hot fudge, creating continuity problems when he huffs out of dinner parties looking like Fabian but, a bit later at his favorite watering hole, looking more like Tony Bennett. Jennifer Aniston, Miss Coppertone 2002-06, does better at acting engaged, but the chemistry of the couple, the basis for their relationship, is never established beyond a pre-credits meet-cute at Wrigley Field and a behindthe-credits photo montage in which they look as well matched as Scott and Laci Peterson. The least you can say about the resolution is that it does not totally betray what precedes it. Caché — Well-chilled French thriller

comparable in degrees centigrade to Time Out, With a Friend Like Harry, Merci pour le Chocolat, Red Lights, et al. An anonymous videocassette in a plastic bag is left without explanation at the doorstep of the civilized host of a book-chat TV show: a two-hour static surveillance shot of the front of the house where he lives with his wife and their twelve-year-old son. A similar second tape, night-time, follows, accompanied by a childish drawing of a figure with blood streaming from the mouth. You can readily imagine, inasmuch as you are put snugly in the shoes of the protagonist, how this might give you the willies. An additional drawing, later, of a bloody chicken and additional surveillance tape of his boyhood home in the country, where now his mother alone resides, would seem to point the finger at an Algerian immigrant, a longago playmate of the protagonist, whom the latter's parents had once planned to adopt. There's a story there, a story hidden, a deep dark secret from the past, unknown even to







the wife. The measured disclosure of it is as much a test of patience as a test of nerve The austere Austrian filmmaker Michael Haneke lowers the temperature a few degrees nearer the deep freeze, even, than the French ideal. He gets unostentatious fine performances from Daniel Auteuil and a thicker-in-the-middle Juliette Binoche, and it's always good to see the venerable Annie Girardot (the mother in the country). He avails himself of no mood-setting background music, staying alert to ambient sound only, maintaining the stillness of a stalker, a voyeur. His spookily empty images, not just the ones borrowed from the surveillance camera, possess something of the expectancy, the pregnancy, of the early-20th-century photographs of Eugène Atget. And the unsettling final shot, outside the school of the twelve-year-old, is a stimulating discussion-starter for viewers whose curiosity rises above "Huh?" Cars — The Pixar people, director John Lasseter in particular, envision a world of cars without people (Mommy, where do cars come from?), but of course anthropomorphized cars, such that the windshields are eyes and the hoods, grilles, and front bumpers form noses and mouths. The vision focusses chiefly on a hot-shot rookie race car called Lightning McQueen, who, en route to the Piston Cup championship on the West Coast, gets stalled in the sleepy



little backwater of Radiator Springs (soon christened "Hillbilly Hell") off Route 66 ("the Mother Road"), which time and the interstate have passed by. Whether or not you can steer around the irony, or

hypocrisy, or cynicism, or what-you-will, of a computer cartoon waxing nostalgic over the slower pace and simpler ways of the Good Old Days, this is one of the better specimens of this type of animation, the airless, vacuum-sealed, climate-controlled, machine-tooled type. The clean, sleek, toylike shapes of the vehicles (straight out of an old Chevron commercial) are easily handled, and their personalities inventively differentiated. The town itself is wittily detailed: the single flashing yellow light on Main Street, the caution-cone motel cabins, the geodesic-dome garage for the psychedelic hippie van, etc. And, outside of the herd of flatulent tractors, the sense of humor refrains from the off-color. And having to listen to Owen Wilson is much preferable to having to look at him at the same time. The motley international cast adds to the air of unreality: some do French accents: some don't: Juliette Binoche does one naturally; Johnny Depp does an Irish. 

In the Beyond department at a Bed Bath and Bevond, an angel (Christopher Walken, looking more like a mad scientist) gives a "universal remote" to a harried workaholic, allowing him to mute the barking dog, fast-forward through a marital spat, slo-mo a busty jogger, replay scenes from his past (with audio commentary by James Earl Jones), change the tint on his own flesh tone (the best idea cinematically), and so on. Fortunately events take a serious turn, or there would have been no laughs whatsoever. The Da Vinci Code — Nonsensical

retelling of the Dan Brown best-seller, premised on "the greatest cover-up in human history," namely the murderously guarded secret that Jesus Christ and Mary Magdalene married and multiplied. (The additional premise that the disclosure of the secret would have the immediate effect of liberating the oppressed worldwide and bringing about an epoch of peace and harmony, and that nothing would please the Catholic Church less, seems dubious in the extreme.) The movie is of course its own separate matter, and inasmuch as it's a Ron Howard movie it's pretty much what we could have predicted, something dogged, diligent, uninspired, overproduced, and crowd-pleasing or at least crowd-pandering. The grainy, color-drained flashbacks, ranging back to the traumatic childhoods of the two principals — a symbologist and a cryptologist — and back, back, back to the Dark Ages, Ancient Rome, and the aftermath of the Crucifixion, testify to the unwieldiness of the transfer from page to screen. The trajectory of the narrative is an odd, dash-and-dot line of breathless chase interrupted by long-winded discourse on religion, Church history, Renaissance art, etc., a high-speed quest for the Holy Grail broken off for pedantic exegesis of what the Grail actually is. Tom Hanks, even with longer hair, does not make a credible longhair. Audrey Tautou speaks English well enough to expand the market for her elfin cuteness. And Ian McKellen carries on in the grand tradition of stage-trained British thespians who have fallen in love with the sounds of their own voices. Still, the movie ought to be cut some slack for its abstinence from pyrotechnics, albeit no abstinence from high technology. And some more slack for its stress on the mental aspects of detective work, although even the code-breaking proceeds at a breakneck pace. And maybe, too, a bit more slack for its crescendo of rhetoric to a pitch typically in the upper range of apocalyptic science fiction. The Devil Wears Prada — Workinggirl comedy in the vein of, oh, say, Working Girl, the eager, gifted, underemployed, and underpaid secretary ("A million girls would kill for that job") and the imperious, capricious, queen-bee boss. An ice queen, more descriptively, with snow-white hair, just a bit of sludge showing through at the neck, and an anemic, cryonic complexion. Meryl Streep, in the latter part, is interesting as always, talking in a narcotized, uninflected voice that betrays no emotion deeper than a sigh. But Anne Hathaway, talking with a clothespin on her nose, doesn't quite fill the bill as "the smart fat girl." Or to put it more flatteringly, the offenses of her weight and her wardrobe are not overstated. Disappointingly, the possibilities of the fashionindustry setting, from Lauren Weisberger's fang-baring novel, largely go by in a blur of montages and a blizzard of name-dropping. An Inconvenient Truth — A documentary for the Don't-Blame-Me-I-Voted-for-Gore crowd. It has a nominal director. Davis Guggenheim, but it's Al Gore's show, a self-described "slide show," or illustrated lecture, and not really a movie, to do with the causes and effects of global warming. This is laid out explicitly as less a political issue than "a moral issue," and laid out, tacitly, as a doomsday science-fiction scenario (think The Day after Tomorrow, think Waterworld, or if you're a reader, think The Drowned World or The Kraken Wakes). with a wealth of facts and figures for substantiation. "I've been trying to tell this story for a long time," remarks our lecturer, who estimates that he has delivered the presentation a thousand times around the globe, "and I feel as if I've failed to get the message across." Thus the movie. A new medium, a new conveyance. Needless to say, the identity of the messenger will by itself be enough to persuade a large fraction of the public to stay clear, on the presumption that all he wants to do is to take away from their annual stock dividends. The Lake House — Irrationally romantic remake of a South Korean film with the Italian name of Il Mare, set in a Lifetime Channel fantasyland where every romantic hero is an architect (the artistic businessman), every romantic heroine is a doctor (the nurturing career woman), and every dream house is on the water (the boundless homestead). Into this boilerplate is introduced what we must call a time wrinkle, a two-year time barrier that separates the occupants of a see-through house on stilts ----"Le Corbusier meets Frank Lloyd Wright" - who are able to correspond with one another, and fall in love without the risk of actually having to keep company, through the agency of a magic mailbox. Only the most thoroughly enraptured viewer will be able to suppress petty thoughts of stock tips, Super Bowl outcomes, etc., that might have been passed down profitably from the future. And even the most minimally attentive viewer will be able, from far away, to see where events are tragically headed, and to wonder whether fate can (or ought to be) altered, and to brace for the sorts of time-travel conundrums that ultimately seem, well, a waste of time. Still, the initial disclosure and additional development of the situation are smooth and deft, and the glossy photography makes effective if infrequent use of Chicago's architectural glories. The Argentine director, Alejandro Agresti, is chiefly known for Valentin, which is to say chiefly known for schmaltz. He doesn't struggle against his typecasting. The on-screen casting, meanwhile, has been calculated with an eye for publicity - the two Speed freaks, Keanu Reeves and Sandra Bullock, together again, at around 15 mph - rather than an eye for the actual qualities they might bring to their roles. At this point in their lives, forty-two years apiece, the foremost quality

Nacho Libre — Nothing if not esoteric: a backhanded salute to Mexican wrestling movies — campy superhero adventures of masked luchadores with names like Santo and Blue Demon - and, more broadly, the whole south-of-the-border wrestling subculture. Odd, offbeat, outlandish as it is, it makes a fitting, albeit unforeseeable, followup to Napoleon Dynamite for its director, Jared Hess. The hero here is a mere wannabe, the potbellied cook in a Catholic orphanage in Oaxaca by day, and by night one-half of a hapless tag team alongside a skin-and-bones petty thief who has been filching the orphanage's donated tortilla chips. The hero's mask and mission will take on Zorro-esque overtones when a pruriently interesting nun, immaculately acted by Ana de la Reguera, lavs down the law: "These men fight for vanity, for money, for false pride." Better, a lightbulb goes on over his head, to fight for a school bus to take the orphans on "field trips and stuff." The gags and their laughs are appro-



priately small — e.g., the pronunciation of 'nitty-gritty" with a Mexican accent, or the amorous come-on of a late-night snack of burnt toast, or the Spartan training exercises utilizing such handy resources as a cow pie and a beehive — and Hess's squared-up, flattened-out compositions are the visual equivalent of a deadpan delivery. Fat jokes and fart jokes serve, to a greater extent than desirable, to offset the esoterica. As does that John Belushi-like Joe Blow, Jack Black, working his eyebrows, nostrils,

lips, etc., with all the expressiveness, the emotiveness, of a Mexican pop singer, and sporting, in addition to his robin's-egg tights with cardinal trim, a 1970s curly perm and gigolo's mustache. The whole thing might seem mildly insulting of all things Mexican, not just wrestling culture and warped English, but religion, music, food (a corncob on a stick), everything. The sympathetic (while still sardonic) portrait of Napoleon Dynamite's Latino sidekick, Pedro, surely should give the filmmaker

The Omen — Calculatingly released in theaters on 06/06/06 (i.e., 666, get it?), but not, heaven forbid, a fourth sequel, an Omen 5, but rather a straight remake of the 1976 original, about the advent of the anti-Christ (presaged now by the Space Shuttle Columbia disaster, 9/11, the Indian Ocean tsunamis of 2004) in the form of the adopted tyke of the U.S. ambassador to Great Britain. A completely uncalled-for remake, too, unless you've been calling for a "better" beheading. (Director John Moore, carving out an unnecessary niche for him-

self, last did a remake of the unimprovable Flight of the Phoenix.) For all its sheen, it loses some star power in the substitution of Liev Schreiber and Julia Stiles for Gregory Peck and Lee Remick, and along with it some parental power. Is Liev Schreiber apt to succeed where Gregory Peck failed? (Mia Farrow, former mother of the Son of Satan in Rosemary's Baby, is gimmickily cast as his nanny, the anti-Mary Poppins.) At the finish, it isn't the influence of the Devil inside the White House that need worry us. It's the prospect of remakes of sequels. David Thewlis, Pete Postlethwaite, Michael Gambon. 2006. Over the Hedge — A population of computer-cartoon Cute Critters, plasticky, foam-rubbery, styrofoamy, and styled to please the eye of the pre-schooler, teaches the lesson that oneness beats aloneness. There are some elaborate and well-timed visual gags, pretty awful to look at nonetheless. The buzzed-up squirrel, not unlike the squirrel in the first Ice Age, rather steals the show. With the voices of Bruce Willis, Garry Shandling, Steve Carell, Wanda Sykes, William Shatner, Nick Nolte, and Allison Janney; directed by Tim Johnson and Karey Kirkpatrick. 2006. * (GASLAMP 15)

Peaceful Warrior — Athletic inspirationalism by way of the Buddhist school of thought, a dizzyingly loopy path. The slomo nightmare of a world-class gymnast drops of perspiration detonating at the volume of thunder, his right leg shattering like crystal on his dismount from the rings comes more or less true, and he entrusts his rehabilitation to the aphoristic grease monkey (a furry Nick Nolte) at the Texaco quickie mart: "This is a service station. We offer service. There's no higher purpose." The story, from a novel by self-help author and former athlete Dan Millman, is purportedly "inspired by true events," and at the very least the quadrennial Olympic qualifying tournament could be said to be a true event. The rest is apt to cause difficulty swallowing. With Scott Mechlowicz and Amy Smart; directed by Victor Salva. 2006. ★ (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest — Sequel to PC: The Curse of the Black Pearl. And more than just a se quel: Part II of an afterthought trilogy. (It was not a matter of *thought*, exactly, as much as a matter of calculation.) Johnny Depp's heavily eyeshadowed, thick-tongued pirate got to be something of a tired act before the end of the first one. And a twoand-a-half-hour kiddie film goes against all traditional wisdom and common sense.

And the tonnage of costumes, makeup, lighting effects, set decorations, CGI, etc., does not make it go any faster. And lastly, the up-in-the-air, to-be-continued ending is as big a cheat, as enormous an imposition, as that of The Empire Strikes Back or Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers, the time-filling middle sections of their respective trilogies. A Prairie Home Companion — Its title and its emcee have been taken from Garrison (a/k/a Garrulous) Keillor's weekly public-radio show. But there is no mention of the imaginary world of Lake Woebegone, MN. The sole setting is the Fitzgerald Theater in St. Paul, named after native son F. Scott, and ticketed for the wrecking ball; and the plot situation is closing night of a long-running old-fashioned live radio variety hour, mixing gospel music, cowboy songs, bluegrass, and blues: a fragile audio fantasy made heavily (and unconvincingly) concrete. Director Robert Altman brings, along with his drifting, disengaged cameras, a deep-seated condescension that makes the loss seem like no big loss. And it goes without saying that he also brings an ensemble cast: Kevin Kline as a Clouseau-esque private eye unfortunately named Guy Noir and unfortunately narrating in first person, Virginia Madsen as a heaven-sent angel in a white trenchcoat. Tommy Lee Jones as the heartless new landlord, and a host of nonsingers as singers, Meryl Streep, Lily Tomlin, John C. Reilly, Woody Harrelson, L.Q. Jones, and the regrettably irrepressible Keillor himself. Lindsay Lohan, purportedly a professional singer, sounds the worst of the lot. (Streep, a passable warbler, always gives more than required or requested, and she alone thought to give a Minnesota accent.) Inevitably there are nice touches, like the new landlord's sour glance at the bust of Fitzgerald during Reilly's and Harrelson's "Bad Jokes" number ("Why do they call it

Superman Returns — A true sequel, despite the nineteen-year hiatus since the fourth and final appearance of Christopher Reeve in the part. (The new Superman and his new Clark Kent alter ego, the littleknown Brandon Routh, not only bears a creepy physical resemblance to Reeve, but also patterns his performance on Reeve's so closely as to constitute an "impression.") The major advantage of a true sequel, namely sparing us the necessity of going back to square one, has been somewhat offset, however, by the modern mania for mythic, epic, operatic grandeur, puffing up and dragging out every little thing. We stil have to sit through a flashback to Superman's childhood discovery of his powers amid the cornfields and haystacks of the Kent family farm. And there's still a wait of three-quarters of an hour until the first quick-change from dumb Clark to Super-Duper. The Lois-and-Clark business remains as absurd and as boring as ever: take away the glasses, curl a forelock, et voilà! And Kevin Spacey's incarnation of Lex Luthor, though sneerier than Gene Hackman's, is still too campy and condescending to be taken seriously, even when his apocalyptic vision of world domination is enacted on a toy-train set, or even when it's enacted on a full-scale Metropolis. Nevertheless, the special effects of an ocean-floor shockwave rippling beneath the city are well done, and not overdone, and Superman's superpowers have indisputably been enhanced by CGI: a point-blank bullet, for example, flattening itself against his Eyeball

Tristram Shandy: A Cock and Bull

Story — Not a straight adaptation of the Laurence Sterne classic, but a sort of parabolic pass at one. The fact that the novel is widely acknowledged to be "unfilmable" (openly acknowledged to be that within the film itself) does not stop Michael Winterbottom from filming the attempt of a fictitious film company to film it. This allows him to stage some plausible, along with implausible, scenes from such an attempt (with a built-in excuse for inadequacies), while at the same time to poke fun at the foolhardy souls who would make the attempt. It also allows him to claim fidelity in some small degree to the "self-reflexive" spirit of the book. (Awareness within awareness: bits of the background music are lifted from Fellini's self-referential 81/2.) The result, no surprise, is unacceptable as a literary adaptation, but acceptable enough as a behind-the-scenes satire, with deft portraits of the insecure leading man (Steve Coogan as "himself"), the film-buff personal assistant whose allusions run to Bresson and Fassbinder, the persnickety technical advisor on 18th-century warfare, among others. All in all, it works out to be roughly a fourth as funny as any half-hour episode of the Ricky Gervais TV series, Extras, on HBO. The fleeting presence here, in an unfunny part, of the delightful Ashley Jensen from that series inevitably invites the comparison. Winterbottom is himself plainly

SEARCHING AND **FEARLESS** | By Frances Kuffel

It's a little embarrassing that I've spent eight years in a 12-step program and not done a fourth step. Twelve-steppers talk about it ("made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves") with a particular pride and dread. It's a rite of passage; an occasion to sigh, shake your head, and look noble for your honesty and courage - not unlike the successful dieter who gets to complain (subtext: brag) that nothing fits. I've never really felt like a member of the tribe until I began what the "Big Book" of Alcoholics Anonymous says is an accounting of the "flaws in our make-up which caused our failure."

There are dozens of approaches to the project, some of them scathing. "Have we ever abused animals?" one eating disorders version asks. "Have we ever taken anyone's life because of our anger, fear, carelessness, or another reason?"

I never fail to wonder who the hell the pooh-bahs of our programs think we are. Did they come up with these helpful questions by following the FBI's psychopathology of serial killers? If someone belongs in Sing Sing or Tutwiler, don't you think s/he knows if and why s/he pulled the trigger?

Luckily, my sponsor has given me a set of gentle instructions for starting my inventory. I'm listing every major event I can remember in two documents for the feelings (negative or positive) associated with the incident.

I've written about ten pages so far, taking me into seventh grade. I'm finding the process revealing.

My reactions to negative events - not being allowed in a secret club when I was four because I didn't have a watch and a credit card — have told me nothing new. I season my two cups of salad with shame, sweeten my one cup of yogurt with selfloathing, and am liberal with the use of guilt and the convictions of my unlovableness in my half cup of oatmeal.

What has been revelatory are the feelings I had around my very early, good memories. Of family events - riding in the motorboat, getting my first bikes, skating with my brother, Jim — I listed exhilaration, freedom, independence. What a little madcap I was at heart, hanging on as Jim pulled the neighborhood kids faster and faster in a spiral of lash-the-whip, jouncing over white caps as my father deviled us across the vast



prairie of lake to pick wild cherries on Cedar Island

If I were to match up pictures of me with these memories, I'd see a girl with curly dark hair and a slightly askew smile, growing — but not starting out — chubbier each year. My hair is straight now, but caught off guard my smile still slants, and lately I'm getting chubbier each year. What happened to the wild child? I last indulged my love of speed a few summers ago on Coney Island's Cyclone, but I doubt I'd fit the seats this summer. My independence is tethered to Master Card, the IRS, and in recent months, an allowance from my parents.

Still. The hoyden Francie whose voice was too loud and who followed any pied piper with an adventure in his pocket must lurk here somewhere, and maybe that hopon-my-bike-and-go-swimming, "faster, faster," screaming kid is a missing component in the thinitude I had once and am trying to reclaim.

I last indulged my love of speed a few summers ago on Coney Island's Cyclone, but I doubt I'd fit the seats this summer.

The other feeling that surfaces is the security of belonging. I sat between my parents in the boat; I was one of Jim's gang for an afternoon; my father taught me to ride a bike and he was in the recovery room after my tonsillectomy, cooing me awake with assurances that I was okay. Safe inclusion was a fleeting feeling or it wouldn't surface as occasion-making. The lack of it turned food into company as my family went its maturing ways, giving me the only approximation I could conjure of the comfort and safety of Daddy's voice reaching into my ether-fog. It gave me oblivion from dwelling on my missing family.

I look at the phrases that keep popping up in my inventory — included, chosen, safe, loved, happy to have attention - and I'm a little ashamed that I still wallow. It's stupid. All I have to do is walk out my front door and wait five minutes. All I have to do is call my sponsor or therapist or fellow 12steppers. There are more dogs to be walked if I need money, and a book advance is coming. Whether I belong and am safe is my choice now, and if I act on that fact and ferret out the wild child I was, this re-loss is going to go down a whole lot happier.

news of the WeiRD

LEAD STORY

- Ron "King Suki" King won the U.S. checkers championship in June in Medina, Ohio, claiming the \$6000 first prize by emerging from a field of 41 competitors whose intensity generally rivals that of more popular and complex games. King, the world "free style" champion, is known as the Muhammad Ali of checkers for trash-talking his opponents. Also competing was another world champion: Alex "The Mad Russian" Moiseyev, who assured an Agence France-Presse reporter that, as in chess, the top players have to think ten moves ahead.

Cultural Diversity

- The Gilgit tribe beat Chitral (9-6) this year in the annual, bloody, take-no-prisoners, refereeless polo match on a remote, two-mile-high field on a mountain in Pakistan, an event that, despite its viciousness, some observers credit with forestalling war between the tribes. According to an ESPN dispatch in May, clubbing of opponents is rampant; horses are treated more reverently than players; and when a star player was thrown and landed on his head, motionless and thought perhaps even to be dead, fans screamed for him to be cleared from the field quickly so the match could continue. He only had a broken neck and concussion.

 Unique Responses to Danger: (1) In May, just after bird flu was discovered in Ivory Coast, hundreds of young people flocked to Abidjan's night clubs to taunt the disease with a new dance imitating a chicken in the throes of death, according to a Reuters dispatch ("leaning backward, shaking [the] wrists, arms and legs ... with a loud clucking sound"). (2) As volcanologists warned of the possible eruption of Indonesia's Mount Merapi in May, nearby farmers continued to listen instead to the mountain's spirits and to continue their rituals and offerings to ward off an eruption, according to an NBC News report. In one region, to preserve the mountain's tranquility, men "gather naked in groups late at night and run in circles around their villages.'

Questionable Judgments

- In May, a U.S. Court of Appeals panel ruled that Scott Panetti remains eligible for execution in Texas despite his delusional and schizoaffective disorders and the opinion of one law professor that Panetti is the "gold-plated craziest" death-row inmate he'd ever seen. Charged with murder after having been drug-addicted since childhood and in mental institutions 14 times. Panetti was nonetheless permitted by his trial judge to act as his own lawyer (and employed a "strategy" of claiming to be under the control of a "Sarge Ironhorse"). He lost the case.

Cleveland judge Eileen Gallagher abruptly dismissed child-rape charges against Norman Craig, 22, in June when the prosecutor was 45 minutes late for a hearing. She further scolded the lawyer, warning him, "Don't treat me like a punk." - After examining 28 cases in which pro athletes received "community service" sentences for crimes, USA Today found in May that in 24 of them, the "punishment" consisted merely of ceremonial celebrity duties, even though the underlying crimes were serious (including assault, statutory rape, weapons violations, and vehicular homicide). One pro basketball player, convicted of having sex with a 14-year-old girl when he was 19, served his 100 hours of community service by being a guest counselor at a youth basketball camp (and included 27 hours' travel time in the 100).

People Different From Us

- On many weekends a year in parks in the Washington-Baltimore area, 100 or more people gather in medieval costumes and wield soft weapons to wage battle in the 20-year-old Darkon Wargaming Club, according to a May report in Baltimore City Paper. Players point out that their hobby is of a piece with historical-battle video games and feature films but still acknowledge the whimsy. Said a club manager (who is the wife of the player "Shalor" of the "Bloody Axe Mercenary Company"), on seeing the games for the first time: "I didn't want to get out of the car.

I thought it was the dorkiest thing I'd ever seen. And 12 years later, of course, I'm running the thing." (An acclaimed documentary film on the club, Darkon, has just been released.)

Cake, Ice Cream, and Jimmy Bobo

- Troy and Jennifer Schally disclosed in June that their son Henry had chosen, among several possibilities as the theme for his third birthday party, PBS's NewsHour With Jim Lehrer, and the Schallys supplied a birthday cake with a photo of the show's correspondents and a periodic playing of its theme music. According to a Washington Post report, Lehrer sent along an autographed photo, signed in the name Henry calls him, "Jimmy Jimmy BoBo."

The March of Science

(1) Researchers from the Institute for Regenerative Medicine at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center announced in May that they had grown a fully functional penis from a rabbit (using his own genes), which they hoped would lead to future development of a human penis for men with birth defects, body trauma, or cancer. (2) Ambreed New Zealand introduced in June a gocart-like machine for ranchers to gather sperm from bulls. A driver maneuvers the vehicle, designed to resemble a cow, so that the bull can mount it. The driver waits patiently until the bull is done and then drives away with the sperm so that manual extraction is no longer required.

Religion in Crisis

- (1) Pastor John Sabbath of the Christ Christian Center, angry at the denial of funding by the Ontario (Calif.) City Council, announced at a June meeting that he was placing a curse on City Manager Greg Devereaux and his family. (2) In June, the Motion Picture Association of America, for the first time ever, announced that it was rating a film PG (Parental Guidance) not for any sex, violence, or bad language, but because it is too openly religious. (The film is Facing the Giants, starring Georgia preacher Alex Kendrick).

 Religious Entrepreneurship: (1) Many British churches have recently installed the new Hymnal Plus, a karaoke machine to help congregations recite verses and sing hymns (including a disco version of "Amazing Grace"). (2) A violent video game based on the evangelical Left Behind novels (Left Behind: Eternal Forces) was introduced at the Electronic Entertainment Expo in Los Angeles in May. The game features the Tribulation Force bloodily battling the army of the Antichrist. Reviews have been mixed (either a positive step to spiritualize the video games culture or grotesque violence sanctioned under the cover of the Bible).

Least Competent Criminals

 Oops! (1) Richard and Stephanie North were arrested in April and charged as the ones who had earlier taken a big-screen TV from an appliance store in Middletown, New York. Police had stopped their car on suspicion because a rear door was propped open to accommodate the huge TV set sticking out of the back seat. (2) Richard Costello, 29, was arrested in Clearwater, Fla., in May and charged with stealing motorcycle parts after police recovered photos of the parts. which they suspect were snapped by Costello. At the bottom of each photo, the photographer's bare toes are visible and display the tattoos "white" and "trash," matching Costello's own tattooed toes.

- William Collins, 37, was arrested in Baldwin Place, New York, in June and charged with DUI even though his car wasn't moving. According to police. Collins was passed out drunk in the driver's seat of the locked car. The transmission was in "park," but his body was positioned so that the gas pedal was depressed, causing the engine to race and start to overheat. Collins was so unresponsive that only when police broke a window did he awaken and notice them



Dear Nervous,

Keep the lines of communication with Mom open; check in with her often. Make it clear that you have no intention of interfering in her love life. Emphasize that you want her to be happy, that you don't want her to get into financial trouble and lose her independence. If you feel that she might do something foolish to endanger her monetary well-being, you and your husband should see a lawyer who specializes in trusts and find out what your options are. If Mom is going to insist on marrying this man (and she very well might, judging by her past track record), you could

strongly suggest to her that a prenuptial agreement is in order, just to be on the safe side. Again, a lawyer can help you explore that option.

Dear Readers,

I received the following response to a letter from a man whose nephew declared that he didn't want to have a bar mitzvah and didn't even want to be Jewish. The uncle was upset that despite the young man's protests, he was being forced by his parents to have a bar mitzvah anyway.

Dear Concerned Uncle,

I am concerned, too, but about more than your nephew - about you. I am a Jew who did not always want to be Jewish, too. And I don't believe in forcing kids to do things, either — homework and baths being notable exceptions. First, becoming an adult male as a Jew does not necessitate having a bar mitzvah ceremony. A party with all the trimmings is not one of our commandments. Once a boy turns 13 (and for some, this applies to girls and women too), he is considered a man and may be called to make a blessing when our Torah is read. This written material forms the touchstone of our connection to the divine that surrounds and sustains us and is also part of our own nature. Being a Jew is not about being devout or how many times you go to temple. It's about

belonging to an ancient people with strong moral identity. It's about being a spark in an eternal flame. How you were raised has nothing to do with it. You can believe or practice however much or little you choose. Still, you are a Jew. That's part of the beauty of it, at least for me. Our people have survived an onslaught of many forces over the centuries. The pressures to disappear into assimilation in this country have been tremendous. Take stock of yourself. Look at your own soul. And may you have peace.

SHOPOCALYPSE

I went to see Reverend Billy in Petaluma. At the start of the day, I was going to go to an antiwar march in San Francisco, but then when I saw that Reverend Billy was coming to Petaluma — fuckin' Petaluma, the "Egg and Butter" capital of California, the town where Pete used to live - I dropped everything and went.

Reverend Billy is a performance artist from New York City — "The collar is fake, but the calling is real" — and he's a hoot. Billy has bleached blond hair (with the roots showing) in a sprayed and gelled pompadour, a cheesy polyester leisure suit, and a gospel choir behind him. He preaches the evil of consumerism; the decay of our neighborhoods when Wal-Mart and Starbucks move in and drive out the local businessman; the "big-boxization" of our culture, where the commons, the town square, the lifeblood of the relationships in a community are destroyed, commercialized, and corralled into shopping malls with Muzak and endless advertisements bombarding our subconscious.

It was a beautiful evening, with a warm breeze and the sun coming through the trees in the way that reminded me of days in Grayslake, Illinois, driving around on hot summer nights in convertibles, drinking beer with people who knew exactly who we were.

Coming off nicotine, with a not-yet-full payload of Wellbutrin onboard, I felt weepy, nostalgic, and wistful, but

mostly labile, with tears flowing from a chemical soup within my brain uncontrolled and uncontrollable. I moved to the back of the crowd, afraid I was going to be viewed as a complete head case if I was at all visible.

The event was at Walnut Park, the equivalent of the commons in Petaluma, with a gazebo and playground equipment.

The crowd was small, I'm sure much smaller than the one who would pay to see him that evening at the Victoria Theatre in San Francisco, where he is better known. But the atmosphere was electric, with a band and the gospel choir from the "Church of Stop Shopping," whom I asked Billy if I could audition for before the performance. He was milling about and shaking hands and told me that they're only in New York, having "failed" to put together a West Coast contingent.

He exorcises the "Devil" of credit cards, asking the crowd to give them up to

him, becoming spastic and possessed when he touches one. "CHANGE, hallelujah!" he says when one has bent his or her card in half.

Billy seems to be not quite "on," in the way one would expect after having seen him on Democracy Now! with Amy Goodman on Free Speech TV. His performance is off.

But Billy gets an uproar-



ious laugh when he talks about how "Tommy Jefferson" and "Jimmy Madison" had no idea that the Constitution would one day be seen as giving us ONLY the right to consume, to buy, all other rights subsumed into corporate right to profit.

He speaks of the "beatitudes," free speech, free assembly, the Bill of Rights. The Choir sings in a way that would put Billy Graham's to shame.

He leaves with his choir and musicians in a huge school bus, dented in the front, painted with "The Church of Stop Shopping," a pile of shredded plastic in his wake.

> The nostalgia of a warm spring evening with a balmy breeze, the sun coming through the trees in a way that reminds me of my youth?





2006 214 San Diego Reader July 20, WHEN I WAS IN HIGH SCHOOL, A WOMAN WALKED INTO A LOCAL COURTHOUSE and shot a man in the back of the head. That's when I learned that everything in the news is reported in a style that holds the most popular appeal.

My hometown is Sonora, California. Down the road a bit is Jamestown. Between Sonora and Jamestown was a metal sign beside a cow pasture that delineated where one started and the other ended. Following that road, you came to the Jamestown library, which on Thursdays and Saturdays served as the Jamestown courthouse. That's where that man was shot.

The library was a single room, no bigger than a couple tables and bookshelves. Along one wall were the encyclopedias; a rack held popular fiction in the corner, and on the librarian's desk sat a dictionary. Before court was called to session, the box of Louis L'Amour books on the table was taken to the back room, and a Bible replaced the dictionary. The judge sat at the librarian's desk, and as the seasons rolled over the Sierra Nevada Mountains, the judge sat to hear why teenagers were caught speeding.

Ellie Nesler was the woman's name. She shot the man there in the library courthouse. The man Ellie shot was accused of molesting her son at one of the summer camps run in the surrounding hills. The man had been a camp counselor. It was probably the biggest trial Jamestown had ever seen, and there were people standing outside and watching the proceedings through the plate-glass front window when Ellie asked her sister for the .38 caliber handgun she carried in her purse.

Blood was splattered across the judge's bench and Dewey decimal card drawers, and Ellie dropped the weapon without a struggle before the sheriff handcuffed her.

Sacramento sent up vans to get footage of their "frontier vigilante girl." The news crews talked to locals who said Ellie should be free because she was just protecting her son, and they broadcast that all over the world. Most of the town thought she should stand trial like anyone accused of any crime, but those people were ignored, and a small group of business owners who were interested in drumming up tourist dollars dressed in cowboy hats and boots and lit candles in a park. The news couldn't get enough of that.

On the TV, our town was depicted as a throwback to the gold-rush days, when women raced through the streets on horseback shooting out the spines of anyone daring enough to cross them.

When it was over and Ellie was up in state prison and the town was back to normal, the news ignored us once again because we were a blue-collar, middle-class town of people in pickup trucks and Nike tennis shoes instead of the boot-stompin' rough riders they needed for commercial interest and market appeal.
