



Ready for towing For most people, charity begins at home. For William Robert Bradley, a cofounder of Metabolife International and onetime tow-truck operator, charity begins in the tax and secrecy haven Switzerland and winds through another hot-money haven, Anguilla in the British West Indies.

Last year, Bradley pleaded guilty to evading millions of dollars in taxes. Metabolife, the herbal medicine peddler now liquidating in bankruptcy, confessed to the same sin. Bradley's sentencing,



which was supposed to be in April, has been extended several times and is now slated for August 31. He is expected to get at least 18 to 24 months, but the probation officer wants to shave some time off that. This month, the U.S. attornev's office strenuously

objected; if anything, Bradley deserves more time, not less, said assistant U.S. attorneys Phillip Halpern and **Kyle W. Hoffman** in a filing with the court.

In mid 1997, Bradley set up the Bradley Foundation, supposedly a charity. Until he came under investigation, it was used "exclusively...as a means of evading the payment of taxes," says the Department of Justice. Only later did Bradley actually direct significant money to legitimate charities, the prosecutors say. The filing details some of Bradley's alleged tricks. He plunked down \$6.4 million in the foundation. Then he used it as a piggybank to fund his deals. Thus, he took a tax break and took the money, too. Under the law, there is to be no extraordinary self-dealing in charitable foundations. The most egregious caper was in 2000; Bradley tapped his foundation for \$4.3 million, which was used as a swing loan to finance his purchase of a Mission Valley office building. Bradley's attorney, Nathan J. Hochman, admits the loan should not have been made. Bradley "has paid taxes, penalties, and interest related to these loans," says Hochman, who denies that the Bradley Foundation was used only to evade taxes until the investigation began. "The foundation has given away over \$17 million to 15 charities, including Father Joe Carroll."

In addition, Bradley pulled out \$63,000 to pay for "lavish" parties at his house. He claimed that amount as a foundation expense. The foundation's accountant wouldn't put her name on such a claim. the filing says. He brushed her off and filed it. The foundation boasted that it was awarding scholarships. But almost without exception, the scholarships went to friends — for example, to the boyfriend of his daughter and to the boyfriend of his second wife's daughter.

With such moves, Bradley drained 90 percent of the foundation's assets, according to the government. By year-end 1999, the foundation was down to \$212,550. Bradley then figured another way to route the money, in effect, to his own pocket. Using funds from the Bradley Foundation, the prosecution says, he set up a Byzantine pathway to snake the loot through the International Community Foundation, a tax-exempt organization in Las Vegas, to its affiliate in Switzerland; then to another foundation and then to another, which had been incorporated in Anguilla. So, says the government, Bradley had two alternatives: 1) Give the money away as required by law; or, 2) "Launder the funds through a series of domestic and foreign entities" so he could evade taxes. He allegedly chose the latter.

When he sold Bradley Towing, he facilitated it through two more Caribbean tax and secrecy havens. the Cayman Islands and Nevis, the government says. In 2002, Bradley bought 10 percent of a small venture-capital firm, Virtual Capital of California. The person who had been named president only two months earlier was Jerry Sanders, now mayor of San Diego. Sanders also had a 10 percent interest. Banker Tom Stickel, a close friend of Sanders and founder of Virtual, says the firm was shut down at the end of last year when it couldn't raise any additional capital. All the investors lost their money, says Stickel. Bradley lost the most. He had put in \$1.8 million worth of Las Vegas real estate.

Dynes has of late been under the gun from members of the state legislature for multiple management miscues.

Outside Lawyers Dodge Filing Requirements

who are under investigation or have been charged over their roles in the pension debacle. With only one exception, those lawyers haven't filed Statements of Economic Interests.

In December, civic activist Mel Shapiro filed two complaints with the Ethics Com-

mission. First, he listed the attorneys representing the councilmembers and bureaucrats and noted that they had been hired by the city manager beginning in 2004 as federal government agencies launched investigations into the City's concealment of its massive pension deficit. The hiring continued through 2005. In a second filing, Shapiro listed the well-paid individuals connected with Levitt's Kroll, Inc., which has now sucked \$20 million out of the city for a pension report, and Vinson & Elkins, a firm that took in \$6 million for issuing two pension whitewashes.

"The attorneys are consultants under the state law," said Shapiro in his complaint, citing a declaration by the state's Fair Political Practices Commission that an attorney hired to perform ongoing legal services for an agency is normally considered a consultant. That's particularly true when the lawyer is standing in for a government staff member, as is true in the pensionrelated cases in San Diego. For the most part, the lawyers' work is still far from complete. Clearly, it's "ongoing," and equally clearly, it's an assignment that normally would have been taken by a lawyer in the city attorney's

Hey, Buddy, Can You Spare a Book?

love to read," says Beverly Griffin, with a glance up from the bedding she is arranging against a chain-link fence behind

the sidewalk on Front Street. As many as 40 homeless people will sleep tonight on this stretch of Front between A and B streets downtown. "A homeless woman is not going to read a book," continues Griffin with indignation in her voice. "Is that what people think?"

Others begin meandering over to the curbside site and settling in for the night. It is 5:45 p.m., 15 minutes past the hour the campers say police have told them they're allowed to arrive. Behind their hangout are two parking lots that serve San Diego Central Courthouse employees. At Front's intersection with A, several men sit on their belongings, smoking and gabbing. In the middle of the block, a man lies on his side staring into a

folded newspaper.

From the placement of her bookmark, Griffin appears to have read the first third of *Sandstorm*, a thick novel by James Rollins. "I read to escape, to get away from everyday things. I don't read the regular things. And I don't read romances," she says.

Griffin, who is 45, characterizes Sandstorm as "an adventure novel. Action, adventure, very nice. And you notice it's from the San Diego Public Library," she tells me. "Every year or two, we have to get our library cards renewed. Last year I got my card renewed, but my address is Rachel's, a [daytime] shelter [for homeless women]. That's the only mailing address I have. So the library considers us transients. They were going to limit me



to two books a day. And I told them, 'I've been living here 20 years. Why should it make so much difference, now I'm homeless, that you're going to limit me to two books?' They said, 'You might lose them or might not bring them back.' And I asked them, 'Can't that happen if you're living in

a home too? All kinds of people don't bring back videos or books or whatever.' So they lifted their restriction for me. But other people, like my friend Blanca, can only check out two books at a time."

Blanca Parks, 42, leans against the fence several feet away. She is paging through Handicapping by Example: How to Pick Winning Horses in a Variety of Situations Where a Standard Handicapping May Not Apply. The book's author is William L. Quirin, Ph.D. "My dad used to train horses, but he passed away about five years ago. I got the book at the library. No troubles there," says Parks, insisting she always takes books back on time.

I ask Parks how long she's been on the streets.

"Homeless three or four years," she says. "What caused it? My stepmother hit me in the back with a broomstick. She was drunk, and I kept telling her I was getting sick. My cholesterol was going up, but she didn't listen to me. So I called for help, and they took me to the wrong hospital. The doctor, he gave me the wrong pills, penicillin, and I got sick. I got my eyes like this, real bad. My friends are worried about me."

Parks pulls thick glasses aside to show me her left eye. It appears to have shrunken in its socket. I want to know more about her going to the hospital. "Was it something about the cholesterol?"

"Yeah, it started from right here," says Parks, pointing to her calf. "I was too fat right here then. And I thought, 'Maybe it's from the cholesterol or something.' Really painful. It made me go down, and I told [my stepmother] so, but she didn't listen, and I had to go by myself. But the doctor gave me the penicillin. I'm allergic to it now."

I ask the men talking at the corner how safe this stretch of Front Street is throughout the night. Eddie Richardson, 43, points behind us to a courthouse wing on the far side of the parking lot. "They have wall cameras up there that watch us. There was a time when we had a problem. Some young kids were going around kicking people, and the sheriffs just came running out of there, because they saw it on their cameras. I've been here at this spot for almost ten years, off and on," he says. "The sheriff's department lets us stay here. And it's pretty safe."

Beverly Griffin agrees, but for a different reason. "The people here aren't doing drugs or drinking, most of the time," she says.

"Does it help," I ask, "that sheriffs are nearby?"

"No. Matter of fact," she says, "I think some of the prisoners leave the [county jail] down the block and come over here to sleep. Those are the guys who don't have blankets or anything. You figure they just came out of jail. 'Cause

they'll be out here in the middle of winter with nothing to sleep on or sleeping on the edge of our blankets."

I spot a woman toting a paperback that must be three inches thick. She doesn't want to speak of the novel — or about her personal circumstances. But she does want to discuss how she thinks safety for homeless women is compromised by occasional police "sweeps." "I reminded a police person," she says, "who I think was from the sheriff's department, that by telling us women every now and again that we have to move and cannot stay here any longer he was forcing us to move to more dangerous areas. We would have to go down to Imperial Avenue or Market Street, where there are empty lots and people who do drugs and commit a lot of illegalities. Here the ladies pick up after ourselves, and we try to get out of here as early as they want us to. It used to be 5:30 in the morning. Now it's 5:15."

Ruth van Duyne, 60, tells me that she doesn't read much, except classified ads, especially those advertising jobs and apartments. "But in 1988," she tells me, "I saw this bag lady on TV, and I said to the Lord, of I want to become a bag lady."

"Why," I ask, "did you say that to yourself?"



In January in closed session, the commission decided to look into nonfilings by many lawyers and consultants, not just those cited in the complaint, according to Shapiro. On February 21 of this year, Stacey Fulhorst, executive director of the commission, sent a memorandum to 21 City agencies and departments, including the mayor and councilmembers, police and fire, auditor and comptroller, stadium manager, labor-relations manager — essentially, all elected officials and bureaucrats.

Fulhorst reminded them that both the City and State of California required that the documents be filed or the individuals be specifically excluded in writing. "Unfortunately, most of the City's departments and agencies are not providing this information to the Clerk's Office," Fulhorst complained. "Ultimately, many consultants are simply not filing anything, which leaves them open to the possibility of enforcement action by the Ethics Commission, the City Attorney's Office, and the state's Fair Political Practices Commission." Some violators are subject to fines of hundreds of dollars, others thousands, according to Fulhorst.

The gist of her letter: get your asses in gear and force the fat-asset lawyers to file or explain in writing why they should be exempted.

Later, she thanked Shapiro for his complaint. She told me that she understands that the Centre City Development Corporation has found 100 people who should file.

In his first complaint to the Ethics Commission, Shapiro listed the attorneys representing bureaucrats and councilmembers: Eric Acker, Colin Murray, Shirli Fabbri Weiss, Sean Prosser, Robert Friese, Thomas McNamara, Pat Swan, Theresa McAteer, Anthony Colombo, Jerry Coughlan, Thomas Zaccaro, H. Paul Kondrick, Pamela Naughton, Frank Ragen, John Wertz, Nelson Brav, and Michael Attanasio. Shapiro charged that they had violated the municipal code by not filing Statements of Economic Interests.

Shortly, Shapiro filed an addendum, complaining that

Arthur Levitt, Troy Dahlberg, and Lynn Turner of the Kroll consulting firm had not filed, along with Paul Maco and Richard Sauer of Vinson & Elkins.

A week ago, Shapiro and I checked the city clerk's office. Of all those attorneys and consultants, only one, John Wertz, had filed. I suspect that he filed because he sits on the Oualcomm Stadium board of directors rather than because he is being paid to represent former city auditor Ed Ryan, who resigned in early 2004, two weeks before the City administration admitted that it had been misstating the pension deficit. Wertz did not return my e-mail.

Typical of those slurping at the public trough, most lawyers and consultants did not answer my calls and e-mails. Some were out of town. All those who answered said they had never been told they had to file. Some argued that they are not required to file.

Said Ragen, "It has never come up. Nobody sent me a letter, knocked on my door; I have never heard of it."

Said Bray, "I have no idea about it."

Said Colombo, "I am not going to comment."

Said Murray, "Neither the City nor the [Ethics] Commission has advised [my] firm [that] the filing of such a form is required."

Said Weiss, "No one has asked that we file a Statement of Economic Interests." Further, she argued, she is not a consultant to the City. She was "retained by private individuals to whom the City owes an obligation to pay defense costs." (Ah, the legal mind.)

Said Coughlan, "I seriously doubt any such requirement exists as to me because, inter alia, I have not represented the city or any department of the city but only individuals." (See Weiss's hairsplitting above.)

Said Prosser and Acker, "We have been retained by the councilmembers for a limited, specific litigation or action and are therefore otherwise exempt from such filing obligations."

Said Swan, "I would be surprised if such a requirement existed, because an outside attorney with a limited engagement does not appear to be within the scope of persons" required to file. Swan represents former deputy city man-

ager and pension board member Bruce Herring.

Friese said he would "file whatever is necessary" if he determines he should do so.

My guess is that these lawyers and consultants will soon be told they must file, but from the tone of their responses to me, they will give the City a tough fight. These are some of the most prominent lawyers in San Diego. They won't want their assets a matter of public record.

According to Fulhorst, each department has its own "tailored" conflict-of-interest code. Departments have been told for a long time that consultants and lawyers they hired had to file or be given an exemption in writing."What we think happened is that the departments weren't realizing that every time they hired a consultant, they had to make the determination whether the person had to file and communicate with the city clerk's office."

Now the city attorney's office is studying how to set up uniform filing rules for the departments. "We're inclined to rule that they [lawyers] have to file," said city attorney Mike Aguirre, although the delayed decision won't come for several more weeks. Some attorneys with limited engagements may not have to file, but those raking in big bucks for long engagements probably will.

Typically, the mayor's office refused to comment.

The money-sucking Kroll consultants and the lawyers charging fat fees to represent councilmembers and bureaucrats "slipped through the cracks, but with hundreds of others. They didn't slip through alone," said Fulhorst.

That shouldn't be much solace to San Diego taxpayers. ■

You know, she didn't have to pay rent and didn't have to worry. So in due time I became homeless because of drinking alcohol and losing my footing in life, mainly jobs and getting involved in the wrong rela-

tionships. And I went downhill, ending up in hospitals with depression."

A man is lying back with Stephen Dobyns's Church of Dead Girls, which a reviewer on Amazon.com calls a "psychological thriller." Richard D. is a fan of Michael Crichton and Stephen King too. A Vietnam vet, Richard came to San Diego from Florida, where he worked 15 years as a nurse before losing his license for cocaine possession.

"The homeless all know one another," says Richard, "so they tend to stay in groups. But the police are starting to crack down. They are trying to move us from place to place." Richard checks his books out of the public library.

It occurs to me that I should pay a visit to the books' source, the library on E Street between Eighth and Ninth Avenues. On my way along Seventh the next afternoon, I meet a diffident reader. He sits with a friend in the shade. He has a thick but cropped reddish

brown beard and the bluest eyes I've ever seen. Though he won't talk to me about his reading, he does show me the book. It is Chuck Logan's Price of Blood. From several reviews on Amazon.com, I gather that the book is a "thriller" about a Vietnam vet turned undercover cop.

"Oh, he has five or six more books in his backpack," says Tony, 43, sitting next to his friend. "I'd rather play solitaire on this," he continues, lifting up a handheld device. "There's the Vegas or the standard type. You get more points on the Vegas. With the standard solitaire, you can deal through the deck as many times as you want, but with the Vegas you can only deal through one time. Then you lose," he says with a chuckle.

Tony doesn't want me to think that playing solitaire is the only thing he does. He says he doesn't think he will be "out here" that long, since he's looking for work too. In the meantime, at a friend's house, he keeps a collection of old National Geographic magazines. "The oldest one I ever had, when I lived in Texas, was from the 1940s," he tells me.

Tony and his friend stay most days and nights on Seventh between E and F. I wonder whether the police ever bother them. "Not very often," he says. "They'll come by to see how we're doing. They'll ask if anybody's been bothering us. It's the San Diego Partnership, they're the ones who come around and want you to move from here to over there, even if it's only five feet. If you don't move, they'll threaten to call the cops." On its website, the Downtown San Diego Partnership says that it "is a leading advocate for the economic growth and revitalization of Downtown."

When I reach the library, I see a man sitting in the sun across the street in front of the post office. The violet umbrella he holds to shield himself from the sun catches my eye. Terry, 48, tells me that "a lady in her early 20s gave it to me one day. She was going to the library. When she came out, I said, 'Young lady, you sure do have a pretty smile.' She said thanks and went to her car. She came back with an orange and the umbrella. She said, 'I

can't offer you financial support, but I can offer you this.' '

Terry sleeps nights atop the post office's northwestern steps. "If it rains," he says, "I go underneath the entrance cover of the library."

During the day, Terry often goes into the library to look at newspapers and magazines, especially the bound Life magazines. He remembers seeing issues from as far back as 1936, but his favorites date from the 1960s and 1970s. In them, he can read stories about "the moon landing, the Beatles, the clothes and fashions of those times, the cars. The magazines have the costs of things back then too, which is interesting for comparison." Other homeless people Terry knows "jump on the trolley and go to libraries all over the city. Some have laptops and take them into the libraries to work," he savs

Until four months ago Terry had a telemarketing job raising money for homeless veterans. He has a good chance, he says, at "getting another job fund-raising for blind kids, if I can get a roof over my head. Things will work out."

The cops don't bother Terry much at night, asking him at most occasionally to " 'take your stuff and move on.' But it's hard to sleep here on Friday, Saturday, or Sunday night. A lot of the clubs are west, closer to downtown, on E Street. Where do they park? Where it's quiet, away from the clubs. But sometimes there are fights between the guys who've been drinking—and the girls too. And in this wooded area behind me," he says, turning toward the post office shrubbery, "there are 1000 rats, at least, that live underneath the ground. At night they come out looking for food. The girls — and some of the guys — start screaming when they see them. And since they've been drinking, they'll squeal out in their cars or throw up around here. Last week a guy threw up in somebody's car. And you hear the sound, the retching, I

guess."

although the police do issue tickets for sleeping on the streets, they are mainly looking for felony warrants. Nevertheless, one man tells me he doesn't want the cops to disrupt his sleep. "The judge is going to rule on my case in the morning," he says. "I'm trying to get 12 years' back SSI [Supplemental Security Income]." The program, according to its website, "is designed to help aged, blind, and disabled people who have little or no income" with "cash to meet basic needs for food, clothing, and shelter."



In the meantime, police have scattered the Front Street group. Many of the homeless moved one block over to Union Street. A week ago the police came again, taking their pictures and demanding they move on. ■







Sky Gazer

The Outdoors section ("Events," June 22) says that the latest sunset of 8:00 p.m. is on June 27. In fact, sunset at 8:00 p.m. began on the solstice and continues at that hour until July. What is the source for the June 27 date?

Jerry Schad responds: The latest sunset of the year is slightly later on the calendar than the summer-solstice date because of something called the "equation of time," which is often used for precise conversions between sundial time (a.k.a. apparent solar time) and mean solar time, which is what civil time is based on. The equation of time corrections vary during the year, and they arise due to both the tilt of Earth's axis and the elliptical path (and nonuniform angular speed) of Earth moving around the sun. The source of the June 27 date of latest sunset is the "Skygazer's Almanac 2006" published by Sky and Telescope magazine. The 8:00 p.m. sunset time mentioned in the "Outdoors" section is an approximation for the San Diego metro area. The observed sunset time varies according to exact longitude and latitude and may be affected by factors such as atmospheric refraction. Mr. Goldman is correct: the predicted sunset time stays nearly the same for a stretch of days from summer solstice to early July. "The Skygazer's Almanac," which is a graphic representation of rising and setting times of various celestial objects, shows this phenomenon well.





We've meddled with cherry genetics enough that some of the resulting cultivars exhibit a few sexual quirks. Ordinarily, a cherry blossom has one pistil, leading the pollen to one ovary in the base of the bloom. The ovary becomes one cherry with one stem. Nature at its most clean and simple, on paper at least. But a few of the sweet cherry varieties occasionally freak out when the weather's hot at budding time. They produce flowers with two pistils. So, one bud, two pistils, two cherries jammed together. Strictly speaking, these are not retail grade, but cherry harvesting and grading is a tedious job, so sometimes twins slip through.

Anytime you see judges on TV, they're always whamming away on their desks with gavels. I've never, ever seen a real judge use one. Do real judges ever use their gavels? And if they don't, why do they own them?

(This is a golden oldie from the M.A. mailbag, at least from the stuff that passed screening by the staff bomb-sniffing dogs. We're filling in while Grandma and the elves are away at the big Yreka Macaroni and Cheese Bake-Off.)

Last time I checked, life was not a made-for-TV movie. I know reality bites by comparison, but we'll just have to live with that. In the meantime, most day-to-day proceedings in a courtroom probably wouldn't score highly with Nielsen families and would be axed from the schedule in midseason. Not even Nancy Grace could whip an audience into a frenzy, given most of what goes on. But to get to the truth in this particular matter, I sent questionnaires to several dozen municipal and superior court judges here in town asking about their gavel habits: Do they own one? Have they ever used one? Just what the heck is going on here?

From the tone of their answers, you could say the gavel is like an appendix on the great alimentary canal of justice. An idle appendage. A vestige of the early days of British courtrooms, like powdered wigs. And just about as useful, except to TV directors.

The 30 judges who responded were virtually unanimous in saying they have never used their gavels. Since they represent nearly 200 years of combined experience on the bench, I think we have a trend here. Only 2 had actually used their gavels. In the first instance, it was used for slightly snide dramatic effect. The judge called a ten-minute recess, rose, and headed for chambers. Despite these clues that there was an official pause in the proceedings, one attorney complained that he couldn't tell that a recess had been called, so for the remainder of the trial the judge accompanied his recess calls with a whap of the gavel for the lawyer's benefit. In the second instance, a witness just couldn't seem to shut up, even after being told to, so the judge resorted to her gavel to make the point a little clearer.

About 15 percent of judges surveyed didn't even own a gavel. And here we find our second basic truth. Judges don't buy their own gavels; they get them as gifts. The judicial equivalent of ugly ties and cheap cologne, the inevitable thoughtful presents from proud friends and relatives. Most judges seem to stow their gavels in chambers or leave them on the bench to get lost under stacks of files and papers. Some keep them at home.

Asked why judges have gavels at all, aside from the predictable gifts, most jurists are stumped for an answer. Gavels make handy paperweights, or you might crack walnuts with them, some suggested.

One judge summed up the situation by declaring that his bailiff's sidearm is more effective at keeping order in the courtroom than any gavel. Besides, he admitted, if he owned a gavel, he might be tempted occasionally to throw it at "deserving attorneys" or to "induce certain witnesses to be more candid in their testimony.



How To Own A Thoroughbred

urns out last week's screed on gambling (emphasis on legal gambling in California) was incomplete. I assure you staff will be disciplined, but in the meantime, let's shout out the good news about mule racing! Yes, pilgrim, the exhilarating sport of pari-mutuel mule racing is legal in the Golden State!

I have Don Jacklin, president of the American Mule Racing Association, on the phone from his kingdom in Post Falls, Idaho. I want the where and when of mule racing.

"It started back in 1976 in Bishop, California," Jacklin says. "Bishop had non-pari-mutuel, unofficial races associated with their Mule Days celebration. That's where I got hooked. Then, legislation was passed to allow pari-mutuel betting for mule racing, but just for one year, 1979 or '80, and just one weekend, and it was restricted to Bishop.

"We took it a step further in 1980. I was able to author legislation here in Idaho for pari-mutuel betting on mules at all the fair circuit tracks. The following year we took it to Montana and got pari-mutuel betting there."

Okay with me. "How many mule races did you run in Idaho and Montana?"

"Minimum of one, and sometimes two races per day on an eight-to-ten race card of thoroughbreds and quarterhorses. The purses were very small, \$200 to \$600. Then, we went to Oregon, got pari-mutuel betting in Oregon. Then, we went to Nevada, got it passed at their tracks. And then we came back to California, approximately eight years ago. We approached the legislature and asked them to allow or extend their previous pari-mutuel legalization to include the entire fair circuit in California. They passed the bill.

"That was the big breakthrough," Jacklin says. "We moved from \$400 to \$600 purses in Montana and Idaho to California, where most of our purses average in the \$5000-to-\$6000 bracket, with a couple being as high as \$14,000. California has been the place that everybody has gone, including myself."

Funny, it does seem like everybody has come to California. "I was surprised to learn that there are only 60 to 70 racing mules on the fair circuit here."

"Right now I've got 78 on my records who have run at least once. However, out of 78, we're down to 72 or 71 who are still racing."

Let's see, the 2006 California Fair Racing

schedule is made up of seven county fairs spread from Ferndale to Pomona. Fair season runs from June to October, yet only 71 mules are racing. Seven plus 71 adds up to...financial opportunity of a lifetime! "There are racing mules for sale on the Internet for \$4000. A normal person could afford to own a mule thoroughbred."

"Absolutely," Jacklin says. "Mules run more often. A quarterhorse or thoroughbred runs once every three or four weeks. Mules run once every four days. Their vet bills are a fraction of what a horse's vet bills are. Mules don't have the feed requirements that quarterhorses or thoroughbreds do. They're very affordable. Most people go into [mule] racing to have a little pizzazz. If they break even, they've had a good year, and they've had the enjoyment of owning the race animal and rooting him on."

I shall name my racing mule, "Let Your Mind Be As A Floating Cloud." "Do you train a mule differently than a horse?"

"The general principles are the same. You have a little difference in age. Mules develop a little bit slower. And by developing, I mean closing the cup on their knees. Their kneecups don't close until age three. Horses' kneecups start to close late in age two. So, we start mules a year later.

"Mules are different," Jacklin says, "because you can't push them too far. If you push them against the [training] wall, they'll reject, they'll go backwards on you. You can push a horse into a wall and he'll either fall down and hurt himself or keep on trying to go. Mules, you've got to take 'em a little slower on the training, and they certainly race differently. Jockeys use a bat [whip] on racehorses, and they can bat pretty good and get some reaction. Mules, if you start overbatting or over-sticking them, they'll honker up and slow down. There is a fine line."

Perhaps I should mention that besides being president of the AMRA, Don Jacklin is also founder of an international seed-production company, has more money than we can count, likes to hunt in Mongolia, and one of his mule champions, Taz, ran against the legendary Black Ruby at Del Mar in a \$10,000 match race. Jacklin was a prime mover behind cloning the first equine by funding research at the University of Idaho. Jacklin is racing clone mules in California this year and...we'll have to come back to this next week.

St. Paul's Cathedral displays a kind of unadorned majesty. Long green banners, tiny stations of the cross, and a couple of Madonna-and-child paintings are all that break up the great expanses of smooth, gray-green concrete around the narrow stained-glass windows. The walnut panels and brushed-metal organ pipes that grace the front of the church seem almost simple, as if trying to remain tasteful despite their grand scale. The altar cloth is richly embroidered, but in muted tones. Only the raised pulpit complicated carved wood yielding up figures of the Evangelists and the cru-

cified Christ — is ornate. But once the bell tolled and the people rose, the music became its own sort of adornment, Lavers upon layers of swelling organ, verse after verse of the hymns, led by the choir but amply followed by the congregation. They sang harmonies on the Gradual Psalm, the organ building and receding in

dramatic fashion: "My soul is athirst for the living God/when shall I come to appear before the presence of God? My tears have been my food day and night/while all day long they say to me, 'Where now is your God?" They sang the "Creed," sang Schubert's "Sanctus" and "Agnus Dei," sang the "Our Father," even sang some of the liturgical responses.

The liturgy provided further grandeur. A parade of men and women in white cassocks followed the choir down the aisle - candle- and cross-bearers, servers, vergers, attending priests, assisting clergy, and finally, in a cream chasuble, the presider: Reverend Canon Joan Butler Ford. At the reading of the Gospel, Reverend Dorothy Curry removed the silver-coated book from its pillow on the altar and bore it down the center aisle. Before her walked a verger — his director's wand resting on his left shoulder — a book-bearer, and two candlebearers. A man with a thurible followed, the incense curling into the air above the

Sunday's liturgy celebrated the feast of St. Mary Magdalene, and the Gospel recounted her

discovery of the risen Christ on Easter morning. 'They have taken away my Lord," she cries in the cemetery, "and I do not know where they have laid him." Jesus comes to her and tells her, "Go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your

The Reverend Canon Jack Lindquist mounted the pulpit for the homily. "Speaking just for myself after hours and hours of wading through New Age gobbledygook about Mary Magdalene in The Da Vinci Code, I think it's wonderful to meet this woman again as a real person in today's Gospel.... At the end of today's Gospel, Jesus 'apostled' her...he sent her on a mission with a message to speak in the sender's name. The ancient Christian writer Tertullian extolled her as...'the apostle to the apostles."

Lindquist continued, "You didn't have to be one of the 12 to be an apostle.... Today's Gospel is when women entered into the apostolic succession of the church's ministry. Here, at the very

beginning—it couldn't happen any earlier!"

A subdued laugh rose from the congregation. "Would being a woman somehow invalidate that apostolate? Yes, it would — if you were an idiot." The subdued laugh gave way to hearty chuckles and applause. "All Christian preaching begins when Jesus 'apostles' Mary Magdalene, and so we pray that Presiding Bishop Jefferts Schori may truly be her successor.'

Then he returned to Mary Magdalene before she saw the risen Lord, when she was still bereft. "The very worst fears on Mary's list have taken place, and she seems forever separated from God.... Now, she is really ready for Easter If she and the other disciples had not seen the risen Lord, had not eaten and drunk with Him after he rose from the dead...I can assure you that there would have been no Christian gospel. There would have been no

memory of Jesus in the world today.'

Lindquist closed by noting that Mary Magdalene recognized Jesus when He called her by name. "That's how the risen Lord is calling each and every one of us, seeking a personal relationship with us.... The crucified and victorious one is coming to us in Holy Communion today, that we might receive him into our hearts and lives as master.'

During the announcements, it was noted that "whoever you are, wherever you are in your journey of faith, please know that you are most welcome to participate in everything we do here." And at Ford's liturgical invitation — "The gifts of God for the people of God" — the congregation approached, knelt, and received Communion.

What happens when we die?

"I would refer you back to Jack's wonderful sermon," said Ford. "As God is always with us here, then God is going to be with us when we die. I firmly believe that.'

Word spread about how my friend Bernice was going to rent a margarita machine for her summer margarita bash. The guest list started growing from 20 to 40 to over 100. Along the way, someone noted that Bernice and her husband Frank are celebrating their 20th anniversary this year, and that became the theme. For Frank's sake,

I decided to go barbecue hunting — in par-ticular, on-site barbecue. I didn't want him to have to cook, but I knew he'd want the smell of meat and smoke in the air.

I found Gib's Ribs (619-517-1659; www.gibsribs.com). Chefowner Keith Gibson, who hails from Maryland, explained that while there are different types of barbecue, it's all "comfort food. There's nothing like good barbecue, slow-cooked so the meat falls off the bone. Some people like a mustard-type barbecue, but in Memphis, you've got your vinegar-based, with the sauce served on the side. That's what I do. My sauce is sweet and tangy, with a hint of lemon, hickory flavor, and spice. Just a little bit of hot; nothing serious, just a little burn on the back of your tongue."

Gibson serves slowcooked meats done in a smoker (though burgers, veggie burgers, and hot dogs may be added to some menus). "When you slowcook and smoke, you're cooking around 225 to 250 degrees on indirect heat. That means the fire is off to the side." Wood provides the fuel. "California doesn't have a lot of wood, not like the southern states, which have all the fruit and nut trees. There, you can use pecan wood, cherry wood, and apple wood. Those give the meats different flavors, and even colors. When you first cut into your smoked meat, you will see a smoke ring. It's like a red film all the way around the meat. The color of the ring changes, depending on the type of wood. Red hickory or red oak wood make the meat come out very dark. I think it's so dark that the meat looks almost burned; that's why I don't use them." In California, "the most

popular wood mesquite. I mix mesquite with apple wood. I leave the mesquite on the bottom layer in the smoker — it burns hotter — then I wet the chunks of apple wood and put them on the mesquite. They mix together. It gives a wonderful flavor, and it smells good. When youfirst light off your smoker, you let the mesquite burn until the coals get white; it takes a good 30 minutes. Then I put my racks in to start cooking the meat, and I close down the smoker lid. The smoker operates through vents, which control the airflow and the temperature. If I want the temperature at 250 degrees, the back vent is open halfway. If I want to bake a pie at 350, I open the ventilation up all the way."

One round of hot coals will hold its heat a long time in a smoker. "Those ashes

are actually hot a day or two after cooking. That long heat-life allows for lots of slow cooking. Ribs slow cook for three hours, chicken for two, tri-tip an hour and a half."

Tri-tip sounded like an option, so I asked after his method — Frank and my husband Patrick are forever arguing about whether or not to trim the meat before cooking. "I put a rub on it and stuff it with garlic," said Gibson, "but I prefer to buy it with the fat on. They call that 'unneutered.' I cook it fat-side down, and when it cooks, the fat produces juices in the tri-tip and it puffs up." Score one for Frank. "I let it rest and cool for 30 minutes, then I cut the fat off the back. Then I slice it. I get 13 to 15 slices out of it. Then I've got a little secret method for tenderizing. I do this with all my meats. I pan it up and put in a little wine. Then I seal it with a commercial-grade aluminum foil and put it back on the grill for an hour and a half. It steams, reheats, and tenderizes it.

The ribs fall off the bone, and the tri-tip melts in your mouth."

Other meats get much longer treatments. "You can smoke anythingpork shoulder, pork butt, or brisket. Brisket takes a very long time, 12 to 14 hours. The pork butt for my pulled pork takes 10 hours. When it's done, I can grab the bone in the meat

and twist it right out. We serve that with rolls and everything, so you can build your own Memphis-style sandwich" - roll, meat, sauce, and coleslaw.

Because of the long cook-times, Gibson often does some prep before arriving at the event site. "Sometimes, we cook it partially ahead of time, sometimes we cook everything except maybe a case of food. We call that 'show food.' People enjoy the ambience and the aroma," and the show food will provide that as they chow down on ten-hour pork.

Gibson's smoker, which he converted from a pig-roaster with the help of a welder friend, arrives on a 20-foot trailer. "It's pretty impressive. When I bring both my smokers, I can cook for 1000 people. But I'm flexible; I do parties for 30 people. (Menus range from \$13.95 to \$17.95 per person


based on groups of 200 or more. Prices are higher for smaller groups.) "My menus are full service. With each menu, you get your main dish and three side orders" (e.g., baked beans, corn on the cob, Caesar salad, coleslaw). Pricing includes rolls, fresh-baked cookies, cutlery, condiments, buffet-table setup, linens for buffet table, "and canopies that we can put over the buffet table. We give you a two-hour serving time, and when we are finished, I give the leftover food to the client. We package everything up, put foil on it, and label it. You get the

It's not uncommon to worry about an abnormal Pap test result, which could be caused by a number of things. This includes high-risk HPV (Human Papillomavirus), a common sexually transmitted infection which may cause problems of the cervix, and rarely, even cancer. "I know I gave them to one of these kids," said the head valet, whose face seemed to be growing paler by the second.







WOMEN THINK THAT MEN ARE HAIRY WOMEN



was about to participate in a seminar where women spend two days learning about men. I mentioned my upcoming appointment to a few friends and acquaintances and asked them what they thought.

Woman One: "Seminar? Why go to a seminar? Men are so simple. That seems like a big waste of time."

Woman Two: "It's sad that society's generated this belief in a gender gap. Some people are from Mars, some people are from Venus, and some are from Saturn. We're all different, and complex as well. I think it's pathetic to go to a seminar and try to learn quickly about some complex subject that should take a lifetime to learn. (Of course, I'm 34 years old and single.)"

Woman Three: "Those women are desperate stupid idiots. Why don't they read a book in bed and figure it out for themselves?"

Man One: "What a sick bunch they must be. Why don't they just go to bars? Yikes, what a scary thing."

Woman Four: "There's not much to be gained from categorizing people. I'd rather go out to dinner with a man than learn about his psychology."

Man Two: "The word to women is often, 'You're okay.

There's nothing wrong with you.'

But the message can also be that men are boorish, unappreciative creatures."

Man Three: "Good idea. Study the enemy."

Woman Five: "It's the easiest thing in the world to keep a man happy. Feed him and fuck him and leave him alone."

Most of the reactions I got were negative, but not all of them were. One woman told me, "You're either bitter or better. Whatever helps people get better and not be bitter is a good thing."

Many women also asked me for details regarding the seminar, as though they would like to attend. Did it have a good track record? Did I think it would work?

I have another friend who's a male who told me to forget the seminar. "For men and women to learn about each other, they should just read each other's magazines," he said. "Men should read *Elle* and *Cosmo*, and women should read *Playboy* and *Maxim*. Because it doesn't matter what's true or false. It matters what's being said. It's all about the spin."

I considered the hostilities that underlie the most aggressive of these reactions. Are people just against seminars in general? Do most folks share my own built-in aversion to groupthink and submissive conformity? Or these people I'd been asking — and some of the women insisted on being called "Ms." — did they see these seminars as an admission of weak-

ness? Were they against admitting that we need to be fixed, because that implies that somehow we're broken?

To me, self-help is like the CliffsNotes to the great literature of the self. It's a massive shortcut. Instead of reading philosophy and poetry, and paying attention to what our bodies are telling us, and writing down our dreams, and learning to meditate, and traveling widely, and living in different places, and meeting unusual people — instead of participating in all of these instructive and self-renovating pursuits, some

folks make do with reading or following the watered-down teachings of someone else who has done these things.

Instead of learning a musical instrument and a foreign language, we listen to tunes and rely on subtitles. Instead of going for a run, we watch a race. Instead of traveling the great undiscovered country within ourselves, we visit its website.


Is it possible, then, for self-help to really help? CliffsNotes can help us pass the quiz, but then we never come to own the experience of the book. Carrying this

analogy, I'd contend that self-help might tweak a surface behavior or two for the short-term, but then the deeper patterns of who we are will rise inevitably back into view.

"The relations of the soul to the divine spirit are so pure that it is profane to seek to interpose helps," Ralph Waldo Emerson once wrote. We all want to better ourselves, but Emerson taught us that the way to do this was to read poetry and observe nature.

Since Emerson's time, the diminishments of nature and literature have closed off vast spaces in the souls of people, but can those spaces be re-reached and re-appreciated by a system of repeated affirmations, self-actualization courses, and 12-step techniques?

Truly helping ourselves — that is, overhauling our deepest selves — requires a slow and steady accumulation of experiential ingredients. Reading a self-help book or attending a seminar is like buying an already-baked cake. You might enjoy the benefits, but afterwards all you'll have is indigestion and crumbs. Borrowing another metaphor, I'd

say, self-help might teach you to fish, but it won't go fishing for you.

(By now I'm sure you've begun to wonder what my own gender is, or perhaps you've already checked for a clue from my name, dearest reader. But does it matter? I am, in fact, a man, and if you wish to profile me further, then I'll also tell you that I'm 37 years old, divorced, white, and, well, what else do you need to know to contextualize my statements and judge me? Anyway, I'll be attending the aforementioned seminar as a liaison, a representative man, whose role it will be to answer the questions of these selfhelping women. And let me go on record here and assure you that I am not judging these women or this particular workshop. I have hopes for each of them and will attend in the spirit of wanting to contribute, to help the help happen. I may be skeptical about what they're fixing and how they're fixing it, but that's their business, not mine.)

"I think my quest is how to communicate and how to bring peace and love into the world," Cameron said. "So when it comes to men and women understanding each other, there's that burst of knowledge for me in wanting to understand men and have that peace and community and connection with men. I wanted to learn to honor men for who they are. Also, when I started with "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women," I was at a place in my life where I was seriously contemplating relationships and wanting to see what it would take to work together in partnerships with men, to create a successful relationship."

("Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women" is the brainchild of Los Angeles native Alison Armstrong. In 1995, Armstrong formed a company called PAX Programs Incorporated, which now oversees the sales of a novel and a CD and operates six seminars in dozens of cities designed to help women understand and appreciate men. "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women" is also the seminar that I was preparing to participate in.)

And what was Cameron's own history with men?

"Probably you could categorize it as serial monogamy. You know, a series of one- and two-year relationships. I just got out of that four-year relationship recently. And I was engaged once for a very brief time."

And she'd had enough problems with men that she wanted to get help in figuring them out?





Cameron answered, "It felt like if I was seriously contemplating wanting to be in a relationship and eventually to get married, then these tools would definitely benefit me, not only in looking for a

big deal. Women are gatherers; we can notice the details that make certain flowers different from other flowers. But with men, interruptions get them off track."

I interrupted Cameron with my two cents. I told her that most of the characteristics she had just ascribed to women reminded me of myself, even though I'm a man. And the traits she'd said were common to men didn't sound like me at all.

"That's good that you're in touch with your feminine side," she said, and it sounded sincere. "But what I think men value is listening without interruptions. Men usually think deeply and have strong opinions, and their opinions are very much tied in with their values and who they are."

I interrupted again. I

was getting irritated at Cameron's broad generalizations. (Was I growing irritated because my male values were being compromised? Was I unable to accept what she was saying because I was too singlefocused — like a typical male — on a particular implication in her ideas, namely, her stereotyp-

ing?) I told her she was reducing massive complexities into neat little categories.

She didn't blink. "There are fundamental differences with communication," she maintained. "With men, they think, and they build opinions, and then they share from that place, which is kind of a very sacred place for them to share from."

But I told her again that I don't do that and that it was rubbing me the wrong way for her to



lump me in with others of my gender.

"I don't know how to explain it any other way," she said. "That's what I've learned. To listen to a man without interrupting him is a gift that you can give him."

Which is just a nice value for any person to have when they're talking to any other person.

"I guess you could

say that," she conceded. "But I've found that it really helps for me to shut up with men, to hold back, and then they can go deeper with their opinions. That's not something that I've found as much with women."

Fine. Okay. So. What were some other techniques that Cameron had learned from her

seminars?

She thought a moment. "I learned that it's good to give a man some transition time between activities," she said. "If he's just gotten home from work, then it's good to give him time to land and decompress and not just inundate him with questions and tell him about your day the minute he walks in the door."

But what about her needs? What about Susan Cameron? What if she wanted or needed to talk about something the moment her man came through the door?

"Then you give him half an hour," she answered.

So wasn't this seminar just encouraging women to be innocuous and acquiescing?

"Not at all," Cameron said quickly. "It's about getting our

needs met. It's about empowering women to speak what our needs are in a very honorable way."

So it's about passive manipulation.

"No, not at all," answered Cameron, sounding like I just didn't get it. "It's about being open and honest and clearly communicating and honoring each other while you're communicating. So let's say I need eight hours of sleep. And my husband likes to wake me up at five o'clock in the morning to have sex. I might say, 'I need eight hours of uninterrupted sleep.' And I'd clearly communicate that, to let him know that I may be willing to have sex but I also have some basic needs, and we have to learn how to accomplish both of our needs. It's not about manipulation; it's about learning how to see what our











needs are and to ask for them."

Which is a terrific practice for any two people, regardless of gender. Or for any two countries or organizations or groups, for that matter.

I decided to pursue this line of questions with someone who runs one of these seminars. I contacted PAX Programs and got in touch with San Diego's head honcho — the woman who coordinates and organizes and runs many of the seminars here in town — Donna Alexander. Alexander is a wife and mother who's been involved with PAX for seven years. She started out by going to the workshop herself, on the advice of a friend, and she knew right away that she wanted to be a part of getting this information out into the culture.

In time, Alexander was trained to lead courses, which she's been doing since 2002. "So you're a seminar leader," I said, at one point. And she answered, "Technically, I'm a workshop leader. We call them workshops."

Much better word, I thought, since "seminar" is, ironically, masculine, in that it bears the same etymological root as "semen." The meaning of the word in Latin (seminarium) was "breeding ground."

"The reason we call them workshops is because the women actually have to do some work," she said. "We don't do it to them or for them."

Between 50 and 100 women attend each local session of "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women." Prospective attendees have an opportunity, before the workshop, to complete a short questionnaire about what they want to accomplish in the course. Then the workshop leader reads the questionnaires and makes sure that the attendees are going to get


what they want out of the experience. Over the course of two days, the women take notes, do worksheets, and share with the group, but mostly they listen and absorb. At the end of the second day, they test what they've learned on a panel of representative men, which is where I'll come in.

"What we're providing for women," Alexander said, "is a different perspective. A new way of seeing men. Like a new way of interpreting what men are saying and doing. So it's not about changing men; it's about changing a woman's understanding of what men are saying and doing."

I asked Alexander

about her own personal history (divorced, two kids from the previous marriage, now happily married), and then I asked her whether she thought her personal history mattered in relation to her being a workshop leade

"Probably my past is relative in that it makes me real," she answered. "You know, I haven't lived a fairy-tale life. I've lived a real life. And I think that makes me more accessible, and





women are more willing to learn from me."

And what did they learn?

come out of the workshops feeling much more powerful," she said. "Because what we teach them is what men want

"Our graduates

and need but also how to get what they need from men in a really effective

And what way was that? Passive manipulation?

"No," she said. "Authenticity. Telling the truth. Being respectful.

Asking for what they need. I'll give you an example. Often, the way that women tell men what they need is by telling the men all the things they've done wrong. And you can see how that would make a man defensive and not in the best place to provide what she's asking for. So we teach women, first of all, that he's not wrong. He just didn't know. And we teach women to ask for something in such a way that it doesn't make a man defensive but actually inspires him to

want to provide it."

Alexander continued, "Another thing that women have in their toolbox, as we say, is really emasculating men when men do something that women determine was wrong. Which again has a negative impact on

men and the way that they relate to the women. So we teach women how to get what they want without emasculating men."

I expressed to Alexander my own personal knee-jerk resistance to what she was say-

She answered,
"Instead of reducing
people to their gender, I
think what we're doing is
honoring and respecting
how we're put together
and the ways in which
we're different from each
other."

So men and women are just fundamentally different from each other?

"I would say that men and women are very different from each other, and a lot of the trouble comes from both men and women expecting the opposite sex to be like themselves," Alexander said. "But men and women aren't versions of each other. Women think that men are hairy women, and some men think that women are emotionally indulgent men. And if you start from the fact that men and women are more different from each other than we can even imagine, then that's a great foundation to begin from to begin understanding each other."

But what about the masculine traits that you might have, even though you're a woman? And what about the feminine traits that I have in my personality, even though I'm a man?

She said, "We actually don't talk about male and female. We talk about the qualities of femininity and masculinity. And we think both men and women have both."

Okay. So if I were going to make a list, with masculinity on the left and femininity on the right, what would I put under each heading?

Alexander told me, "Masculinity would be about producing results and providing. And you could see how that might be something that both men and women can do,

especially if a woman is a single parent and she's responsible for providing. And on the feminine side of things would be the enhancements in life. The things that aren't as clearly related to survival. Things like art, music,

cooking. And men could certainly be engaged in those. Of course, food is related to survival, but then there's a question of how fancy you're going to make it."

How did Alexander respond to those who

thought she was preying on the desperate, propagating gender stereotypes, and oversimplifying complex issues?

"We don't prey on the desperate," she said. "We help them. Which is what our graduates would tell you. Most people are interested in learning about the opposite sex. And we're not propagating stereotypes. If we were, we'd have a very different name for our workshops. We might call it "Men Are Pigs." But we don't. We call it "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women." And there are a lot of stereotypes that we debunk in our course. For instance, women have the idea that men are really selfish, and we don't see

that. From our perspective, there's something else going on with men that has women view them as selfish, and we help women see that in a different light, a more powerful, more useful light. The women who come to our course are usually frustrated or confused, or they don't have the kind of relationship that they always hoped for, and they're willing to learn something new."

What was Alexander's own history with self-help?

"I tend to refer to it

as personal growth and development," she said, "and, in general, I'm in favor of people doing whatever supports them in having the life that they want. And my personal background is that I've participated mildly in the past, but what struck me when I did "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women" was how much value was there. Because I thought I was already a pretty evolved and educated person, so I was surprised how much I didn't know about men."

When I asked Alexander next what she'd come to learn about men, she started repeating back to me the same teachings I'd heard on Armstrong's CDs and read in the literature about her courses and heard Cameron saying as well. Men are hunters, women are gatherers, men are single-focused and need transition time, women can handle many things at once, et cetera, et cetera.

So I interrupted her (since, after all, women don't mind being interrupted as much as men), and I said, yes, men are hunters. We like to hunt. So what makes a woman think that she can tame a man? What made Donna Alexander think that just because a man settled down with a woman, he was going to stop hunting for other women? Weren't men biologically designed to spread their seed?

"That's true," she

conceded. "Men are hunters, and they are designed biologically to spread their seed. But you may not have experienced this yet in your life: for almost all men, there are gifts that a woman brings to his life that would make monogamy worth it. We teach women not to have the hunter leave home hungry. And we've also seen that men are naturally given to honoring their word, and when a man says 'I do' and gives his word to be faithful, he means it and he does it."

(I mentioned this interchange to a fellow male at work, and he scoffed, "Yeah, right. That's all well and good until some beautiful woman comes up to you in a bar and offers you sex with no strings attached.")

I said nothing. I waited for Alexander to continue.

"A long time ago," she said, "all that was required for survival was that men and women hook up and make babies every so often. And our culture has changed dramatically over the years, and there's a lot more that's possible between men and women than there ever was, with the choices and options we have in our roles. Who could have imagined 200 years ago that a man could stay home and raise the children while the wife went out to work? We have so much more choice now. And it's a good thing, but it also gives rise to more confusion and frustration, having all those options. And there's so much that's possible in the union between a man and a woman, and really understanding each other's needs."

And these workshops and books and CDs are designed to be supplemental to the actual experiencing and making mistakes and

doing and learning for ourselves?

"Sure," she answered, "but I would recommend that people start here as soon as possible. Because our culture doesn't teach us how to be good partners for

each other."

At last, I'd figured out a way to articulate one of my misgivings to Alexander. I told her that I'm not a mathematical equation, and I don't want to be figured out. I told her that I didn't


want a woman to become single-focused and hunt down my needs. I told her that over the years I'd come to respect women who were out for their own needs and who interacted with me and if it

worked, it worked. But I didn't want a woman who was innocuous and acquiescing. I thought that was boring.

"Yes," she agreed. "We don't turn women into Stepford wives. No one likes a milquetoast. We make women strong and powerful and successful and accomplished, the way most of them already are."

But I don't think of women who go to workshops to learn about men as being powerful and

successful and accomplished, I said.


"Oh," Alexander responded succinctly. "I do."

So, of course, I had to go find this out for myself. I had to get into the room for a workshop session of "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women." But I wasn't going to dress up as a woman, and they wouldn't let me audit the full course. Instead, to cap off my own involvement in this subject matter — to blend my misgivings about the whole enterprise and my hope for human improvement in general - I'd have to sign up to be a panelist for the March 2006 workshop of "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women."

Alexander told me that near the end of the two-day intensive, four men would be invited to sit in front of the workshop's attendees and answer questions that the women had developed over the course of the seminar. "You should really try to get on the panel," Alexander said. "Then you will really get to see how committed the women are to understanding you and the kind of safety and intimacy and trust that is possible."

The cynical side of me was reminded of the men's seminars in the

movie Magnolia, with Tom Cruise's character authorizing men to "Worship the cock and tame the cunt." That sick parody had the ring of truth to it, implying: "You want to understand men? Fine. I'll show you the kind of self-help men really want." It's no mistake that those satirically misogynist seminars were called "Seduce and Destroy."

But this seminar, um, workshop, I'd be attending was called "Celebrating Men, Satisfying Women." Seriously. They're just regular folks like you and me. No, but really, they're amazing and mystical and powerful. Oh, never mind. Good luck, son. I don't know a damn thing about women.)

The four of us sat in front of the 50 of them and we laid it out there. laughing, remembering, imagining, and opening up for all we were worth. I must say that it was very gratifying to think out loud and be listened to that way.

At the end of our hour in the hot seats, we were told to do two more things for the women in the room. They wanted us to tell them what we love about women, and they wanted us to pretend that we each had a megaphone and imagine that we could say any one thing that every woman on the planet would be able to

I volunteered to go first. I said that my megaphone statement and the answer to what I love about women would conflict a little bit. Because I hated the idea of reducing women to their gender. Just because our genitalia are different, or because men are usually physically bigger and stronger, or because women can have babies, or because we're socialized a certain way from the time that we're born, it doesn't mean that we're necessarily fundamentally different. I said that I like feminine traits in general - softness, gentility, intuition, spontaneity, artfulness — and I admired women, in general, because they usually found those feminine traits easier to come by. The masculine world we live in — full of wars, power struggles, and money hunger needs more femininity,

So I gave my contradictory message and told the women to stop perpetuating gender stereo-

in general.

types but also to maintain their femininity. I told them that I love them for their femaleness, but that I also loved it when they could demonstrate male traits as well: being aggressive, logical, and efficient. I told the women that their bodies — the vessels by which new human life is carried into the world — are the most beautiful physical material on the planet, and as such their bodies should be cared for and nurtured. But then I had to qualify that statement: looking good means caring about how you look, not looking like Pamela Anderson. And I told these women to be themselves, to interrupt men when they needed to, and to talk about their feelings and so on. Opinions and deep thoughts aren't just for men.

And then the other men spoke, and the women applauded, and a few of the women even stood up to thank us. "You've helped us so much today," one of them said. "Thank you for coming here." And the last words that rang in our ears, before we were ushered out of the room to a standing ovation, and even though we had been there only for an hour and the women had done all the hard work, were these: "You're heroes." True or not, they were good words to hear. ■

SNAP OUT OF IT, DUDE!

few months ago, 16-year-old Amanda slammed the door on her mother. They were having a fight, about what, Amanda cannot recall. She does remember sitting down on her bed and reaching for a letter opener. With tears running down her cheeks, Amanda put the blade against her left arm and made a small horizontal cut.

"It made me feel better," Amanda says. "Not happier...happier isn't the word. I don't know. I guess I felt satisfied."

Although "cutting" is the most common form of selfinjury, people inflict burns and strangulation upon themselves as well. According to San Diego psychologist Dr. Tracy Alderman (author of The Scarred Soul: Understanding & Ending Self-Inflicted Violence), the number of teens who practice self-injury has been increasing during the past ten years.

"Today, there's so much stress in the world," says Alderman. "The world is at war, the economy is so bad, and the role of the family is so different."

Celebrities such as Princess Diana, Johnny Depp, and Marilyn Manson have discussed their self-injurious behavior in interviews and magazine articles. Films such as Thirteen, Manic, and Girl, Interrupted had characters that injured themselves. A&E's Intervention and MTV's Real World have aired episodes covering the topic. Last June, a survey published in Pediatrics magazine indicated that one in five students at two Ivy League schools said they purposefully injured themselves by cutting, burning, or another method.

Alderman became aware of the issue 15 years ago, when a young patient of hers said that she was cutting herself. When Alderman discovered what little research had been done on



nomenon isn't known to exist in thirdworld countries.

Marc Trocchio, a counselor at Torrey Pines High School, says, "I've seen a greater incidence of [cutting] within the last five years." During the past two years, Trocchio says he's received over two dozen reports of selfinjury among students, about a dozen of which were confirmed. "I'm not a psychologist," he says, "but it seems to me that all the cutting is related to personal self-esteem

Rosa, a 19-year-old college student and former cutter, says she began hurting herself in middle school.

"All of a sudden, there was a lot of fighting going on in the house," says Rosa. "My mom would tell me I was dumb. Then I started having problems at school. I had this feeling that I was the cute, stupid one in my group of friends. I took everything really personally. If I had a fight with my mom, I'd go to my room and I'd be crying and it'd be time to go to sleep and I still wouldn't

these fights that she would reach for a safety pin, an earring, or a metal nail file with which she'd cut her

"If you can't deal with it internally, there's something about having that kind of scar," she says. "If you have a scar, it's a battle wound."

Alderman says, "Most self-injurers have an inability to know what they're feeling. They feel like there's a lot of pressure. They feel like they're a teapot, about to boil over. They don't understand how to express that in a way that makes any sense."

Rosa says, "I felt really angry at myself, mostly. Eventually, reality would hit me. I'd think, 'It happened, I'm okay now.' Afterward, there was embarrassment." At school, Rosa began to wear bracelets, wristbands, and long-sleeved shirts to cover her cuts. When she moved on to cutting her legs, she started wearing only pants. She continued cutting during her early years of high

Alderman agrees. "It's not always a dangerous thing; it's not always a crisis. In my mind, it's not always worse than having a drink or smoking a joint. You're doing

somebody through a difficult time — rather than killing themselves — it's a good thing, in that sense.... I sometimes work with a police team. We'll pull up

with somebody who has hurt himself, and suddenly he'll be in the hospital as a suicide risk. But somebody who has had too much to drink? He's just put back in his house to sleep it off. It's also really mistreated and mishandled by therapists, friends, family members there are so many myths and misconceptions."

Some of these myths, Alderman says, are that people who self-injure are crazy, pose a danger to someone else, and that self-injury can't be treated.

When her mother discovered she had been cutting herself, Amanda says her mother"...started screaming, 'How could you do this to me?' It wasn't, like, 'How can you be doing this to yourself?""

Such a reaction is not uncommon. Trocchio says many parents react with denial when they learn about their child's self-injurious behavior.

"My parents still think I'm cutting myself to get attention," Amanda says.

The attention paid to self-injurers has created a new trend, leading many teens to start cutting for the same reason teens do many things: because it's cool.

"It's like listening to rap music," Amanda says. "There are people who listen to rap music because they genuinely like it, and then there are people who just listen to it because it's the trendy thing to do."

Rosa agrees. "There's something appealing about being tortured, being an outsider. There's this attitude that if you're depressed, you've been through something real."

Alderman says, "Kids who don't want to talk about it are often the true selfinjurers. Those that do want to talk about it generally will do it once or twice and be done with it.... If somebody's hurting themselves whether they're doing it for attention or not — they're trying to get some type of reaction. They need to get some kind of attention. Do

they want more time with an adult? Do they want more attention from their parents? What is it that they want?"

These sentiments strike a chord with Paul, a 19-yearold SDSU student who cut himself throughout most of his adolescence.

"You're not trying to do it to get caught," he says. "Still, I just wanted somebody to care. Was I calling out for attention? Yeah, I was. But nobody wanted to give that attention." Like Rosa, Paul began cutting himself in middle school. Living alone with a single parent, he says he often felt lonely and depressed.

Alderman says people often confuse self-injury with suicide.

"People sometimes go overboard with self-injury," says Alderman, "and I've seen a few accidental suicides - or a few accidental deaths — because people progressed too far with self-injury. And then I've seen people where self-injury wasn't enough, and they've later ended up killing themselves. But it's a different act. They don't start out thinking, 'I'll self-injure,' and in the same ten-minute period think 'Oh, I'll kill myself."

Paul says, "It was never about suicide." At his most severe stage of self-injury, he was dropping a kitchen knife from various heights onto his wrist. "It was like a test: let's see how far the blade can go." One night, the blade cut deeper than usual, striking bone. "I was, like, 'Snap out of it, dude!' I was thinking, 'Shit, am I gonna die?' I'd been thinking about death, but I didn't want to die." Paul says he hasn't cut himself since that night.

Rosa says, "Eventually, I just stopped. I don't remember why. I think things just got better."

Alderman says most self-injurers begin cutting in early adolescence and stop by their mid 30s. "It ends by itself," she says. "People don't need it anymore." She says most self-injurers have some degree of anxiety or depression, though it may not go to the point where it can be diagnosed. In cases where self-injurers have clinical anxiety or depression, Alderman says prescription medications may help. Amanda, Rosa, and Paul believe they have clinical depression, though none of them has taken or is currently taking antidepres-

What can parents do if they discover their child is cutting?

"You can tell someone that you'd like them to stop," Alderman says. "But you can't make them stop.... Basically, let them know that they aren't alone, that they aren't crazy, and what they're doing is really something that they're doing to help themselves, but there's other help out there if they want it."

Currently, there is only one program in the United States devoted to treating self-injury. The SAFE program is located just outside of Chicago, and can be reached at 1-800-DONT-CUT. ■

JOHN J. MONTGOMERY'S SOARING FLIGHTS,

(part 2)

MARCH 16, 1905. "Now don't get carried away up there," John Montgomery shouted to his pilot, Daniel Maloney. "Just fly the craft"

No one had done this before Maloney. A touring parachutist, he would board a tandem-wing glider. A hot-air, smoke balloon would tow the glider 3000

by Jeff Smith feet aloft. Then Maloney would cut the glider loose and descend in wide circles down to Manresa, near Aptos, California. Mal-

oney, whose professional name was "Professor Lascalles," had performed the feat several times in practice and wanted to try more difficult maneuvers. But this was their first private showing and included local reporters. So Montgomery, who had designed and tested "aeroplanes" for over 20 years, cautioned: "Don't get carried away by enthusiasm." Just make a careful, balanced flight, and land safely.

Twenty men held ropes as the balloon fired up. Maloney, who parted his black hair down the middle and pinned eight medals the size of silver dollars to his chest, made a sweeping, circus-act flourish. Then he climbed into the contraption of fortified canvas stretched across a spruce

frame

The men let go. The balloon rose. The rope tipped the glider's nose upward, then hauled it aloft like the tail of a kite. At 1100 feet, a strong north wind bullied through heavy ocean air. Too strong. Maloney cut the glider free. For three minutes he circled back and forth, floating on rough currents.

Observers who'd never seen flight before couldn't tell if Maloney was succeeding or in grave danger. Then he descended, landing gently in a field.

MARCH 20, 1905. Before a slightly larger crowd at Manresa, Maloney dropped from 3000 feet and soared a total of three or four miles in different directions. Sitting on a leather saddle, he maneuvered the craft with stirrups and steel shafts, tacking with or against the prevailing breeze. "I simply poised in the air and flew around," he told reporters, "darting back and forth, up and down, as easily as an eagle could have done it." After an 18-minute flight, he made another perfect landing.


Astonished onlookers congratulated Maloney. "I never felt anything like it before." he said. "You simply soar through the air as if on the back of a bird!"

An unassuming man in a tall derby and dark brown, rumpled suit shook Maloney's hand. "When I went out to meet the aeronaut," John J. Montgomery later wrote: "I felt I could do anything with that machine; I felt I had accomplished the first step toward successful aerial navigation."

Though expert in mechanics, astronomy, and electricity, with a PhD in physics from Santa Clara College in 1901, Montgomery's lifelong passion was to learn "the science of the bird." It began in 1863 when, as a five-year-old, he saw fleecy clouds perched on a mountaintop. Assuming they were "resting," as if between flights, he thought he could grab one and float away.

Between 1883 and 1885, Montgomery experimented with gliders at Wheeler Hill on Otay Mesa. Three models with flapping wings failed to get airborne. So on Saturday, August 28, 1883 — 20 years before the Wright brothers flew at Kitty Hawk — he tried one with cambered "gull wings." The first attempt, his brother James attests, caught a gust of wind and soared 600 feet to the base of the hill. By moving his body like today's hang gliders, Montgomery said he could influence the machine's direction. Though others dispute the distance, biographer Arthur Spearman hails the attempt as "the first controlled airborne flight of man in heavier-than-air craft."

Montgomery was more thrilled by the "self-buoyant" feel of flight than by the distance. But he didn't like the glider's lack of lateral control and scrapped the design. For the next 20 years, he told an interviewer in 1905, he made model after model and launched [them], "only to meet disappointment." He filled hundreds of notebooks, "endless problems worked

out to the feather-edge of an infinitesimal fraction — weary days and long, still, nights of patient labor to be done — the dry, dreary road of detail to be traveled."

Along the way, he acquired an unfair reputation. "In those days," wrote college classmate Fred Morrison, "anyone who mentioned 'man being able to fly' was considered a little bit off. When John was in the vicinity, there was a general tapping of heads. Nevertheless, he proved we were all mistaken. He was a genius before his time. And his invention finally caused his death."

APRIL 29, 1905. To celebrate President's Day, Montgomery scheduled a flight at Santa Clara College, where he was a professor of physics. The three attempts at Manresa were trials. This would be the glider's world premiere.

He invited teachers, students, 25

reporters, and his family. Colleagues were calling it "the greatest invention of the age," he wrote his mother, "and are going to make the first exhibition a grand affair. You must be here. It will be the event of your life, and an opportunity afforded very few mothers."

She came with her brother, and two of his sisters, joining at least 1000 others at a vineyard south of the college. Many wanted to see if the tandem-winged "bundle of flimsy sticks, fabric, and wires" would crash. They stood in a wide circle around the balloon, which was attached to a telephone pole. Forty feet away students had dug a fire pit and run a pipe to inflate the balloon. As a precaution against flying sparks, the ever-cautious Montgomery placed water buckets along the pipeline.

At 11:00 a.m., the balloon bulged from a tentlike pyramid into a 40-foot-tall, 27-foot-wide "pear shape." Two dozen students held it down with tether ropes. Others attached the glider. To honor the school's colors, Montgomery had the craft painted white, the wingtips red. He stenciled "Santa Clara" on the underside. Then Maloney appeared wearing redand-white circus tights (and the eight medals on his chest). He gave his handlebar moustache a theatrical tweak and climbed into the 45-pound glider.

Rev. Richard A. Glee-

son, S.J., blessed the event. He replaced Archbishop George Montgomery, who declined to speak because he feared future planes would be used for "frightful war-bombing." Gleeson prayed this would never happen.

Montgomery eased the balloon over the glider with a winch. Out of nowhere, a blast of wind tore the restraining ropes free. The balloon shot upward. Spearman: "The sudden jerk did no harm except that a small anchor and rope fell from a great height through a

a thunderbolt." The crowd gasped.

"No...no..." Montgomery shouted. "He's steering downward."

Maloney broke the fall and leveled off. He tacked into the wind, then rose with a sweeping arc. To give further proof of his skill, he threw in some flashy figureeights.

"Gradually we groping mortals began to realize that the aeronaut was truly flying with the utmost of ease," Nunan wrote. "In exchange for that dazzling privilege

neighbor's roof."

Maloney waved to the crowd as he rose above Mission Santa Clara. The balloon and glider grew so small they resembled a basketball towing a butterfly.


Maloney taped a hunting knife to the vertical strut. At 4000 feet he cut the towrope. Without its ballast, the balloon spun away. The glider dropped, free-falling like a leaf. Then Maloney steered it in wider and wider circles. Suddenly, as fast as the wind whipped up at take-off, the glider made a steep plunge, writes Thomas Nunan, "like

any of us might have gladly forfeited a portion of our allotted period of mundane existence, but for the uncontrolled fear of forfeiting all."

The 24-year-old Maloney soared and swerved for almost 15 minutes. He made his task seem so easy, onlookers didn't realize that, at 1000 feet, an updraft almost capsized the craft. He fought wind "from all directions at once" and finally broke away.

Then came the ultimate test. For a landing site, Montgomery chose a wheat field, half a mile southeast of the college and far from the elec-



Spectators watched the craft feather out of the sky, but couldn't see the touchdown. As they ran toward the field, a signal came that Maloney was safe. A second signal: he hit the mark and landed, literally, on his feet. A roar bulged through the crowd.

When the first to arrive asked what it was like, Maloney replied "a little cold up there," then added, "I never for a single moment felt dizzy. I sat astride the pelican-like wings, and ... could guide the machine any way."

Octave Chanute, experimentalist and historian of early flight, called it "the most daring feat ever attempted." Alexander Graham Bell, who devoted much of his life to aeronautics, proclaimed: "All subsequent attempts in aviation must begin with the Montgomery machine."

The May 7 San Diego Union had to remind its readers that Montgomery was "an old San Diegan" who, 20 years before, flew gliders in "the head of the bay region" - and who, the Sunday feature neglected to mention, was ridiculed for his attempts. Forty-five years later, San Diego named Montgomery Field, and later a high school, to commemorate his pioneering achievements.

MAY 21, 1905. To prove that the April 29 exhibition wasn't a fluke or "newspaper stunt" — and raise muchneeded funds for future tries - Montgomery scheduled a demonstration at the San Jose Agricultural Park. A poster for the event, entitled "Winged Man Sweeps Skyward," proclaimed it the area's "only chance to witness this marvelous wonder." Admission: 25 cents for adults, 10 for children.

In the public's mind, Montgomery was a rising star. But in his letters, he often complained of "fraud, graft, and treachery." In 1904, Captain Thomas Baldwin

Hamilton and his wife, who ran the ticket booth, ended up taking all the gate receipts.

Montgomery had identical, tandem wing gliders ready: the Santa Clara and the California. As the balloon inflated, and Maloney boarded the Santa Clara, someone unlocked a rear gate at the park; 1000 freeloaders stormed in.

Whether the new throng made them nervous, or they were merely excited, the men holding the winch cables let go too soon. The Santa Clara "jerked loose from the bal-

plagiarized Montgomery's ideas about dirigible balloon propellers. Montgomery threatened to sue. "I regret he has gotten into a wrangle with Baldwin," Chanute wrote the Wright brothers, "and I fancy in this and in the development of his aeroplane he is like the young bear who had all his troubles still to come."

On the day of the flight, Frank Hamilton, owner of the towing balloon, demanded \$500 more than the amount specified in his contract.

loon before an elevation of 150 feet," wrote the San Francisco Examiner. "At this trivial height the soaring qualities of the aeroplane were practically nullified."

Although Maloney negotiated the craft over trees and buildings and made a successful landing, the crowd booed and velled "Fake!" Hamilton's team inflated a second balloon. Maloney changed planes.



upward, but two cables that should have dropped free clung to the wings. "Don't cut loose!" Montgomery shouted, stressing their first rule of safety: "Ride the balloon down!"

Maloney didn't hear him. After about three miles, he struggled to free the glider. But a new trigger-release had jammed. The balloon floated out of sight to the south.

As the wind whistled through the support wires, and trees passed beneath him like wide green clumps, Maloney felt the control mechanism wobble. Suddenly the fuselage trembled as if about to come apart. Then he realized: someone had loosened the stove bolt nuts and twisted the rods. Maloney tried to tighten the bolts. Too many were loose. For 30 miles, he clung to the tow rope, terrified the California might break apart, and thankful he couldn't cut it loose. He crash-landed near Gilrov.

The huge crowd catcalled and screamed "Fake." They demanded their money back and called Montgomery a charlatan with a bigger scam than snake oil.

JULY 18, 1905. The *California* had been unguarded when the freeloaders broke through the rear gate. Someone "pretending to be a Montgomery mechanic" must have committed the sabotage during the confusion. But who? Why? Montgomery never found out. But from then on, he guarded

"America's first test pilot," had been a cadet in his youth. Cries of fraud had hurt him deeply. He vowed to give his comrades "the most sensational flight they ever heard of."

On a clear, sun-bright morning, uniformed cadets stood in rows at attention. When the line from the balloon to the plane stiffened, Maloney shouted "Let her

"Ride the balloon down!" Montgomery yelled, pointing to the problem. But Maloney couldn't hear him above the cheering cadets. He waved and shouted "Hurrah for Montgomery's airship!"

When the balloon reached its peak, Maloney didn't detach the glider. Those on the ground assumed he saw the problem and would ride it out. Then the glider broke free. Montgomery: "Did he take a risk not to disappoint his friends?" For Just before he crashed, he waved to the tannery workers, one said, "in a kind of farewell."

"Oh Mother of God!" Montgomery cried, as he held Maloney's unconscious body, "Why did this happen? I prayed so hard for safety." Thirty minutes later, in the college infirmary, Maloney died.

Montgomery disappeared for months. Accidents, sabotage, now a death—he groped for causes. Having lived with it all his life, in a letter written Novem-

1000 feet he "glided beautifully," and Montgomery and the crowd relaxed. Here would be the risky, high-air spectacle Maloney had wanted to perform since

He nose-dove the glider, but couldn't draw it back. As he gained speed, writes Montgomery, "the rear wings commenced to flutter violently and the machine, heading down, turned three forward somersaults and settled on its back."

For 2000 feet, it floated. Then, 150 feet from the ground, the left wing snapped straight upward. Spectators heard a sound like popping corn: the ashwood frame began to crack.

But there was still hope. Maloney fishtailed down on an angle. If he could glide with just the front wings, he might still pull out. Or was he steering toward safety: a soft mound of tanbark at

ber 17, 1905, he identified another possibility: "the bitter criticism of the public and the continued cry of 'fake' because of our unsuccessful attempts. 

tion and a disregard for the criticism of the public." Although the accident was a"terrible blow," Montgomery vowed to keep going: "I have satisfied myself too thoroughly of the inherent equilibrium of my machine to cease in my efforts."

OCTOBER 31, 1911. At Otay Mesa and Santa Clara, Montgomery regarded mastery of "soaring flight" as stages in a process of careful, patient work. Even though the Wright brothers flew a motor-propelled craft at Kitty Hawk in 1903, Montgomery never designed a plane with an engine. By 1911, a time of air shows and a Curtiss biplane landing on the USS Pennsylvania, Montgomery still kept to his - some said "self-isolating," others "outmoded" --original plan. "He anticipated many important advances," writes Spearman,

but "Montgomery had the fault of many inventors; he was stubborn. Fixedness of purpose both made and destroyed his life's pattern."

Though he considered himself a scientist, not a pilot, Montgomery had flown as much as the five men he trained (every one of whom, he complained, thought flying planes was too simple to require practice). Encouraged by his new wife, Regina, Montgomery took to the air again. During the last two weeks of October 1911, he and mechanic Joseph Vierra combined for 55 successful flights at Evergreen, a camp in the foothills, five miles south of San Jose.

Called *Evergreen*, the craft was a sleek monoplane gilder with a cambered wing, four-wheeled undercarriage, bucket seat, and yoke-control stick. One of the most modern-looking planes of its era (a model hangs from the ceiling of the Aerospace Museum) Evergreen was to be the prototype for Montgomery's first enginepowered aircraft. To take off, the machine clicked down wooden rails into the prevailing northwest wind. On October 31, after several short runs, the 53-year-old the nose flared oddly upward. Montgomery shifted his weight forward to create stability. Reinhardt noticed a "puzzled look on his face." Less than 20 feet in the air, the craft stalled, then swerved, fanning down to the right. A wingtip hit the ground. Evergreen made a languid flop and settled upside-down

Montgomery made a minor adjustment to the horizontal stabilizer. Convinced that this was it, that he had finally mastered the equilibrium of flight, an elated Montgomery prepared for one last try.

Regina, Vierra, and Cornelius Reinhardt (another mechanic) watched Evergreen roll down the rails, into the afternoon sun. Then on the straw-yellow hillside.

The crash didn't seem severe. The cause? Probably some minor technicality they could fix in the morning. But Montgomery lay motionless. First to arrive, Reinhardt saw "blood and grey matter oozing" from behind Montgomery's right ear. The landing had thrown him sideways. A 45-cent stove-bolt had come loose and punctured his brain. Reinhardt pushed the blood and ooze back into Montgomery's head — so Regina coming up the hill, wouldn't see it. Vierra ran to a nearby ranch to call a doctor, who took the wrong road and arrived too late.

"What happened?" Montgomery asked, slowly losing consciousness. "Where am I?" And, his last words, "How is the machine?" — Jeff Smith



ly-fishing in San Diego becomes with time, if you love fly-fishing, more and more improvisatory. This year, when winter Santa Anas threw my garden all out of whack, the hose seemed more like a fly rod than it ever had before, the precocious flowers more like fish.


A buddy and I went exploring in Peñasquitos Canyon and found some creek water big enough to hold bass: brown, murky, rain-swollen, confined to brush and tight quarters that would bedevil any backcasting. We poked around, peering into pools, and at sunset met a father and two youngsters carrying spinning gear and a Ziploc baggie holding three half-pound largemouths. The canyon seemed greener than anything, greener than the hillsides that seemed to shadow every inch of it, greener than the tomato fields aligned atop the mesas. The coyotes came alive, and the bittersweet yapping drifted over the canyon floor until dark.

Fishing for bass in San Diego approaches religion; if you don't pursue it, there are dark questions regarding your claims as a genuine local sportsman. We are talking about world-record territory, rivaled only in Florida. Nevertheless, as a fly-fisherman, I see bass-fishing as being as arcane as, say, falconry. I am quite aware that there are anglers around who get bass to rise to the fly. But it can be awfully hard to find them, especially through the smokescreen of Magnumlite Hungry Stiks, ball-bearing plug casters, swivel-seat powerboats, electronic fish-finders, and other popular

accouterments deemed essential by both Pro-Tourney and weekend bassmasters alike.

You sit at your simple flytying vise, suspended between fur and feather, and you recognize your lack of auxiliary support. Nor do you retain the guidance of that rich literature enjoyed by trout fishermen, which, if allowed to run to extremes, will have you tying dozens upon dozens of life-imitating flies, a number proportionate to the vol-

umes of grandiloquent prose of trout-writing at its worst. For some reason or another, bassfishing has failed to inspire the angler — and his contemplative bent — to reflect wholeheartedly

Perhaps it has something to do with the victim's peculiarly predacious nature. Feed for bass can include worms, snails, crawdads, leeches, salamanders, small rodents, other bass, and (reportedly) ducklings. Sport aside, the best way to catch bass, and just about any fish, is to attach something live and wiggly to a hook on a line, cast, and wait for Nature to take her course.

Still, this is no place to argue the virtues of fly-fishing, which, extolled from the purist's point of view, nauseate folks all over. I need only mention that the natural development of any fisherman, except possibly the big-game fisherman, is toward fly-fishing and that this development is intrinsic if fishing is ever to mean anything more than the killing of fish.

The bass fly, however, is in fact a rather ignoble creation. Unlike the delicate precision of trout flies, or the graceful simplicity of saltwater streamers, bass flies are plump, indecorous, and, at times, obscene. I don't know how you'd go about representing a young mallard; but you see just about everything else tried. Given the proper temperament, one could probably get his name affixed to a pattern for lowland hummingbirds. And it wouldn't really matter if such a fly caught fish. Considered in toto, bass fishermen belong to that category of sportsmen who will try anything once, and stop at nothing.

I tied up a handful of rough, nondescript bugs, and by dawn the following weekend my buddy and I were double-timing it up the canyon. It should be noted that fly-fishermen have a thing about crowds. Put two strangers on the same stretch of water, chances are they'll avoid each other like vacationing counterspies. Rising in the middle of the night, only to be beaten to the local reservoir by a line of cars equaling those at a Chargers game, the fly-fisherman may well lapse in fraternity altogether. More than once I've turned back home to pore over the out-of-state property ads in the Union classifieds, the coffee in my Aladdin thermos still hot.

The alternative to crowds, short of sinking your

life savings in a private East County bass pond, is to find yourself a backwater hollow, accessible only on foot. For obvious reasons, I'm not providing maps of Peñasquitos Canyon, nor of San Elijo Lagoon, the Olivenhain drainage, the top-secret ponds of certain popular golf courses. Yet even if I did pinpoint these and other classified bass holes, I doubt it would start a stampede. Bass fishermen will drive for hours to reach this week's promised waters, and they'll crisscross the lake, burning fuel like water-skiers. But when it comes right down to it, bass fishermen are about as active as bridge players. Given the choice, they prefer a sedentary approach, casting from the seat of their pants.

By sunrise we were deep in the canyon, passing rods from side to side as one hand and then the other demanded warming in a pocket. There was frost in all of the low spots; on the rise to the north, Black Angus stood grazing in the sunlight, looking like boulders of coal. Up ahead a great blue heron rose from the grass, then settled aloft in the leafless sycamores. We could hear the telltale screeching of a red-shouldered hawk. It wasn't exactly Marlboro Country, and we were a long way from any honest-to-god, blue-ribbon fly grounds. But — we were going fishing, almost in our back yard,

and we had a notion the neighborhood fish would hit flies.

We reached the pools and strung up our rods. In minutes, without any words

Casting within shouting distance of one another, we might as well have been in of your hunches have fallen flat, there's that traditional tendency to reach for the flask - or, in some recent circles, to roll a number. We weren't that discouraged. Nonetheless, we hadn't seen a fish, and our talk had the slightly desperate tone of two motorists inspecting a fenderbender, both of their vehicles uninsured. Well, what do we do now?

If you're a fly-fisherman, you first give your flies the once-over. Is your woolly leech woolly enough? Your inchworm a fraction long? Then you begin to wonder about your casting, or, in the vernacular, presentation. Was my line turning over, the leader straightening? Was the fly slapping the water? Was my pick up, alas, shoddy?

From there, you are but a step away from falling into the pitiful fretting of very

many learned fly-fishermen. With a tradition that was already well established in 1486, when Dame Juliana Berners's first descriptions of gear and methods were printed in England, the sport of fly-fishing, and all of its vagaries, has been parlayed into a sort of common consciousness. The difficulties of fooling brown trout in the clear, gentle chalk streams of southern England are somehow the same as those of catching little largemouth bass in a dinky San Diego creek. So you can go to the well until you're blue in the face, trying to recall someone else's solution to the problem at hand. Or — and the advice is entirely sound — you can

take a brief stroll and thank the skies that you're able to get outdoors, and then go ahead and just keep wetting a line.

We moved up the canyon, swinging wide around the first stands of oak, and then lost the creek to cottonwood bramble. We backtracked to the last open pool. Now the sun was square on the water, the shadows of morning tucked under the banks; the pool lay as quiet as stone. We got down on our knees and crept to the water, through reeds right up to our necks.

I found some casting room and tied on a new fly, a Marabou muddler that looked like a cross between a salamander and a hippie. I tossed it to the head of the pool. There were two tiny falls there, and I let one drown

the fly. Then I worked the line in, picked up the leader, and I shot a cast into the heart of the pool.

The fly sank quickly, a strategy of some note. At the turn of the century, fishing a fly underwater was considered not only ineffectual but also illegitimate. So strong was this moral code that a certain G.E.M. Skues, who fathered the method, was forced to resign his rod on Hampshire's famous Itchen River, after having held it for 45 years. In the end Skues won, albeit posthumously. Today, any argument between fishing the fly on or below the surface seems as dated as questions in basketball regarding the relative merits of the jump shot and the set shot. Nevertheless, every fly-fisherman agrees that seeing a fish strike the fly atop the water

is the champagne of the sport, and anything else will always seem second best.

But you do what you must. And at the moment I had hooked a fish, my firstever San Diego bass on the fly. I did in fact see the strike, that queer, wiggly muddler disappearing against a flash of lime-green. That the fly had vanished inside the bass seemed all the more remarkable on landing the fish. It was a small one; I've surf-cast with flies practically as big as that fish. Yet there it was, a bass and a fly, and the hook was set solid as any I've seen.

I freed the fly and released the bass. My buddy gave a little hoot. I watched him switch over to a muddler of his own, and he started to work his fly back and forth through the air, eyeing the pool with relief. "Well," he said. "I guess they're here!"

You come full circle, making of fly-fishing what nothing else in your life can ever quite offer. Beyond the intangibles of sport, which are no small part of human psy-

chology, fly-fishing affords one the pleasure of learning, learning that is never complete and that never smacks of our practical hankerings for success, status, and love.

With the one bass under my belt, and others that day that followed, I set myself to a new problem: bringing a bass home alive. In the back yard of my home there's a pond, cement-lined, which neighbor's cat got to them. Still, it's a good little pond, surrounded by ferns and succulents and masses of spring snowdrops, and for some time now, we'd been thinking a bass would fit in well.

It should be mentioned that the transport of live freshwater game fish in California is wholly illegal. That remains the business of the Department of Fish and Game, the same organiza-

harbors a fascinating cross section of freshwater life. Some years my buddy brings tadpoles he collects from a vernal pool near his workplace, and we toss them in with the mosquito fish, aquatic snails, and whatnot, their growth into frogs dependent upon the shelter of proliferative vegetation. Once, my landlord's son introduced a pair of bluegill, but a

tion that helped decimate many populations of native trout by planting hatchery-reared exotics in streams and rivers. On the other hand, places like San Diego owe much of their freshwater sportfishing to species brought in from afar, and no right-thinking angler would have it any other way. Just as there is nobody, in the big picture, native to San Diego, there is



no such thing here as a native

I returned the next evening to Peñasquitos, hiking alone under gray winter skies. I was late to start with, Sunday chores being what they are, and by the time I reached the lower pools, with rod and a five-gallon bucket, I was close to losing the day. But a knoll there was dressed in a shooting-star bloom, more pronounced than the morning before, and if nothing else, it felt like spring.

I went right back to the top little pool, and in no time at all I had my bass. I put it in the bucket, along with plenty of creek water. Now was when I should have made directly for home. Yet I liked the way that bass had hit, in a part of the pool where before we'd found nothing; and like fishermen everywhere who have just caught a fish, I wasn't quite ready to call it a day.

I picked up another bass, gave it back to the creek. Our pond being what it is, my intentions were far from initiating a stocking program of my own. Moving downstream and laboring some with the bucket, I went potshotting from pool to pool, the fly like a die in a one-die crap game. It wasn't a very thorough effort. But in a tight little hole below a sweet little fall, I got hit again; and for the first time on the creek, I watched the long rod really

bend. It turned out, later, to be something short of a lunker. A long way short. Still, it was a decent bass, half again as big as the one in the bucket, and I was tempted to keep it. No I wasn't.

There's a point reached in every fly-fishing career where the angler kills very few fish. Those he does kill, usually for private reasons, become part of his memory, in the same way, in youthful times, one retained past lovers. If a fisherman takes life in finding his pleasure, it is reasonable to ask of him that he learn as much from each killing as he reasonably

I released the fish and finally started for home. The bass in the bucket still seemed in good shape, but right away I could see I wasn't going to get anywhere lugging five gallons of water. I tried pouring some out. My bass jumped, landing in a tuft of grass. Well after dark, and still deep in the canyon, I was kicking myself for that hour of twilight casting. Three or four miles are a long haul with a bucket of water, even half a bucket. At the same time, from a fish's point of view, sloshing around in a couple of gallons of water is nothing short of a pistol-whipping.

I couldn't walk fast enough. By the time I reached the foot of the canyon, I was stopping every hundred yards or so to pass the bucket from one hand to the other. Sometimes I reached down inside it, and now my bass hardly moved at all. I spotted the herd of Black Angus, ghostly against the hillside, and the damp night air smelled of manure. Frogs were croaking a death march, and I was thinking, "If this little fish dies, I eat it. It will be the saddest meal of my life."

I got to my car and raced for home, forgoing the usual swing by Roberto's taco shop and sweating like a hound. I made the old Ford go. From the driveway I hollered at my girlfriend, and I had her hold a flashlight over the pond. I brought the bucket into the light and tipped it

down; the bass slid out and into the pond, like a wet sock. But in the morning it was all right. I found the bass lying quietly under the moss, and it seemed the mosquito fish were holding to the shallows. My buddy came by, and for kicks we tossed in a couple of worm salamanders.

I'm thinking about naming my bass. I've never had a mind to name my chickens, which, on all counts, would only be asking for heartaches. And I certainly don't want to feel for a fish as I do our pet cat. But maybe I just will go ahead and name it. If it makes it through the next Santa Ana, I'm going to call it Trout. ■



I took the first job I could get working as a courier for a local bank, but within a year my position was outsourced, along with a flotilla of other American occupations.

Unemployed, depressed, and vulnerable, I received an advertisement in the mail for Glendale Career College. It was pure propaganda. On a good day it wouldn't have caught my attention. The ad promised a high-paying, exciting career as a surgical technologist. In less than two years I could be working with surgeons in the operating room. How difficult could it be? The only requirement was a high school diploma. The proposition was irresistible for a man at the end of his life savings and self-esteem.

I called and set up an appointment with the director at Glendale's satellite campus in Ocean-side. She massaged my fears of tuition with tales of generous financial aid and grant possibilities. Within a week I drove to the North County and took a tour of the facilities. The classroom was located within the old operating and recovery rooms of a local hos-



pital. The early '50s decor reminded me of the soap operas my mother used to watch when I was growing up. Standing in the surgical suite, I could not help but ponder all the patients who must have bled out onto the tile floor.

The adrenaline spike of my

reverie was all it took to convince me of a new vocation. I took a rudimentary test any lab rat could have passed, then signed my life away. In a few months the administration issued me the standard green scrubs that were the school uniform and classes began. It was all too easy.

Learning to put on a gown and gloves and set up an instrument table without contaminating oneself was like learning the steps to a dance.

About 20 students reported for instruction with me. The first portion of our training involved academic education in anatomy and physiology. Having experienced four years at another university, I expected a rigorous study environment. When our instructor basically gave out the questions that were going to be on our first exam, word for word, I was surprised. I was dumbfounded when some of my colleagues failed the test, in spite of having everything short of the answers handed to

them on a silver Mayo Stand. By the time we moved from the chalkboard into the lab, class size was significantly reduced.

School became more challenging once we diverged from books and got into the old OR. There we practiced antiseptic techniques and assisted in mock surgeries. It wasn't until I got in the lab that I began to understand what the job of a surgical technologist actually involved. It was much more complicated than my imagination had led me to believe.

We had to practice the art of hand-washing for weeks to get it right.

Students began to drop like flies the closer we got to internship. Sometimes it was trivial things that broke them. When our instructor informed the class that jewelry was not allowed in the OR, one young woman naively asked him if that applied to her nipple ring. We laughed at the query, and she never returned to school again. The party was evidently over, as far as our teachers were concerned. Their

reputations were at stake. If we began our rotations unprepared, it would reflect negatively on them and the school. As a consequence, they became drill instructors in a medical boot camp which only made me more nervous. I had a lot to learn if I wasn't going to make a fool of myself in the OR.

The surgical tech is responsible for setting up and maintaining a sterile field during an operation. He or she must guard against contamination of instruments, self, and others performing an operation. Every movement is choreographed to keep the environment antiseptic. Learning to put on a gown and gloves and set up an instrument table without contaminating oneself was like learning the steps to a dance. We students made a lot of mistakes and were berated by our instructor. If the process wasn't difficult enough, the people who worked in the operating room were far from easy to get along with.

The world of medicine is a monarchy. At the top of the pyramid is the

omnipotent, godlike surgeon who is beyond reproach. In the eyes of the hospital, and in his own mind, he can do no wrong because he is the source from which all cash flows. His emotional maturity is often inversely proportionate to his intellect. The anesthesiologist is the professional equal of the surgeon, but he or she is often more mellow, probably due to the secondhand anesthesia inhaled throughout the career. Below the doctors on my hierarchical scale is the circulating nurse, usu-



ally hardened by years of brutal servitude and a chronic drain of compassion. She clings to the only thing she can control: the operating room. Her personality is about as sterile as the inside of an autoclave. God help you if you don't do things her way. She will have you removed with the soiled linen. Below her is the lowly surgical tech. In this paradigm of power, abuse flows down through the chain of command until it reaches the smallest fish in the pond. The bottomdweller, the scrub tech, doesn't have a chance. This was not the work environment I envisioned when I signed on the dot-

ted line. Our lab instructor at Glendale was a former tech who trained in the Navy. For purposes of anonymity, I will refer to him as "Joe." Joe was excited by his position as our teacher because he'd found a classification of people lower than himself to control: students. He

had years of pent-up frustration waiting to be released. As a consequence, he used his position to dream up impossible problems dealing with anatomy, which we spent hours researching, only to discover that even the average doctor didn't know the solution. It was time that might have been better spent memorizing the plethora of surgical instruments and their various nicknames. We spent many class hours learning about almost everything but the tools of our trade, which every tech knows is the heart of the job.

Our time in the lab passed all too quickly. It was followed by several weeks of service in various hospital departments. I spent about seven days in the stockroom unloading trucks and running errands for the staff. A few students complained that they were being asked to do menial work for free. I tried to use the experience to familiarize myself with

all aspects of the hospital and its employees.

From the warehouse, I was transferred to the OR to help clean scopes and cameras and wrap instrument trays. Surgical instruments with fragile optics cannot be sterilized in an autoclave. They must be cleaned by hand. It wasn't prestigious work, particularly when it came to wiping down scopes that had just been exploring some stranger's colon, but someone has to do the job.

My last assignment was a week in the Sterile Processing Department. The SPD was located in the bowels of the hospital. It was a lot like the hell described by Catholics in The Baltimore Catechism. I was put to work in a kind of spacesuit, hauling stainless-steel carts out of an elevator that came down directly from the OR. Hospital employees instructed me to sort through the carts and do an initial cleaning of instruments that had just

been used in various surgical procedures. I became a kind of glorified dishwasher, scrubbing human flesh off of retractors and hemostats. The worst part was dipping my hands into basins of blood, searching for tiny forceps and scalpels. A skin puncture was always possible so I had to sort carefully through the equipment lest I get stuck by a forgotten needle or blade.

After the instruments were washed, they had to be assembled into metal cases which were run through the autoclave and wrapped in towels. Part of the suspense of the job was never knowing what would come down in the carts. Often the doctors left fragments of tissue and bone stuck to drill bits and towels. The gore fascinated me, but nothing prepared me for the

actual experience of working in the OR.

In order to graduate, a student had to complete 123 surgeries. A certain number of the operations had to be done in each medical specialty. By the time I finished school, I had done rotations in orthopedics, neurology, gynecology, gastroenterology, vascular, ophthalmology, as well as general surgery. I could sense that



Our teachers may have been good surgical nurses, but they lacked training in basic educational techniques. I didn't know what to do with the gift and promptly threw it in the biohazard trash. It was an unnerving beginning to what I hoped would be a



My first surgery was a bilateral hip replacement. It was a difficult procedure for a virgin tech due to the large amount of instruments, screws, pins and implants required. Since I was one of the best students in class, Joe wanted to test me by starting my career off with a difficult assignment. I had to dress in a spacesuit which made it difficult to hear the surgeon's instructions. To complicate things further, about 40 percent of the instruments set up on my back table were unknown to me. I was hopelessly unprepared for the task ahead. My first mistake was testing the drills and reamers while the patient was still awake. The circulating nurse cursed at me in a whisper and ordered another staff member to scrub in and assist me.

This hospital was not designated as a teaching institution and some of the healthcare workers resented having to instruct us. It was not in their job descriptions, and we were made to feel their anger. The resentment was overt, and a few of my classmates dared to talk back to the doctors and nurses when they were verbally abusive. These students were pulled from the OR and lectured by the school administration. They were threatened with suspension or worse. I quietly absorbed the negative comments and concentrated on doing the best job I could with the limited knowledge I possessed. This does not mean that the demeaning statements did not affect me. After a difficult day at the hospital, it was my habit to go home and curl up into a fetal position in my bathtub and cry. My schedule for the next day was usually unknown until I arrived in the OR and read the board. Thus, there was no way to prepare. I thought about quitting but I was already in too deep. My money and time were unrefundable. Somehow I got up each morning and walked through the fear.

In spite of the pressure, surgery could be unbelievably fascinating. Peering into the body of a breathing human being was a lot different than looking at detailed drawings in an anatomy text. I

found the various viscera to be far more beautiful than I'd imagined. Watching a neurosurgeon cut open a skull, and glimpsing the dura mater of the brain pulsating with each heartbeat, blew me away.

Occasionally, there would be a case where the surgeon would point out something bizarre to my

untrained eye. One day we were pulling out the ovaries of a woman when the doctor found a cyst. He called a pathologist to examine the growth on a separate Mayo Stand while we finished up on


the lady. I was invited to take a look at the specimen which, to my surprise, had bits of teeth and hair inside of it. The bizarre nature of this dermoid cyst, which evidently was not uncom-



mon, was like something out of a horror film.

I was also surprised by the amount of force applied to the body in various procedures. The sensation of steel driven into bone by a mallet is surreal. In some orthopedic cases, I was called upon to hold a leg while the surgeon hammered a rod into a femur. The amount of muscle applied surprised me.

There is no way to accurately describe the feelings I had during a bilateral mastectomy when the doctor casually gave me a woman's breast to be bagged and sent to the lab. The weight of the organ in my hands changed me forever. I thought of the children it had nurtured, the lovers it had known, only to be brutally excised and discarded forever. The OR made abnormality normal. It was part of the job.

Blood and gore didn't bother me. I walked in the stuff on a daily basis. Working on one particular vascular case, the surgeon accidentally clipped a vessel and the damn thing squirted all over my scrubs. I was too busy loading clips and handing them to the doctor to care. The only thing that ever truly bothered me was a procedure in which I helped debride (wash out) the gangrenous stump of an amputee. The surgeon used a long clamp and scissors to remove ischemic tissue from around the bone. Something about the forceful way in which he probed the infected stump made me sick to my stomach. I powered my way through the experience and felt stronger because of it.

A lot of my classmates continued to struggle with the OR staff and school administration. I was called to one meeting in which our instructor threatened to pull us all out of the OR because a few students were experiencing difficulties. Being berated as a group didn't

seem fair to me. On one occasion, we reported to the hospital for work only to be called into the classroom and threatened with expulsion. An anesthesiologist had evidently committed suicide, and the hospital staff was disturbed. We were warned to keep our mouths shut about the tragedy when in fact we might never have known about the event if school administration didn't tell us. I was desperate for support from my mentors, not distrust and shame.

In the meantime, work continued. During what should have been a routine laparoscopy (the exploration of the peritoneal cavity with a camera or scope) one surgeon I was working with became weak and had to sit down. Every attempt she made to enter the patient with a long Verres needle just below the umbilicus failed. The doctor complained of flu-like symptoms and seemed to lack the strength and for-



titude to go through with the operation. The circulating nurse called for another surgeon, but he never arrived. The procedure was stopped before it began. I was shocked to hear the doctor say the patient would have to undergo the operation, "the old-fashioned sliceand-dice way," because she could not get the camera inside the abdomen. I felt sorry for the sleeping woman on the slab. The poor lady would evidently have to endure another major surgery due to her surgeon's illness.

I saw a great deal of what I perceived to be incompetence during my OR rotation. During one particular craniotomy, the surgeon and his assistant got into an argument. The verbal wrangling led both doctors to walk out of the room while the patient was still on the slab. The circulating nurse and I looked at each other in disbelief over an open

cranium. The surgeon did return, sans assistant, about five minutes later. He was still in an agitated state. He hit the microscope leaning over our patient's head. I cringed because the scope was made of many minute parts and it would have been easy for one of the knobs or dials to fall off and land in the exposed brain. Somehow, however, we finished the operation.

On another occasion, I was working on a lumbar laminectomy (back surgery) with another insane doctor. The surgeon saw my Germanic name and asked me how to say "shithead" in German. I gave him the information and he promptly called his assistant by the epithet. When the assisting doctor became angry, I was blamed for the remark. It was not a good way to begin a long operation.

The actual procedure was more like a circus than science. The mad doctor was sexually inap-

propriate with the staff. Every time he required suction from one of the young nurses he'd say, "Suck me, babe. That's it — a little deeper...that feels good." The RNs didn't seem to mind. They laughed along with everyone else in the room.

Once a patient's spine was exposed, and the surgeon asked me to reach inside and wiggle the vertebrae with my fingers. When I refused, he berated me for being shy and moved the bone back and forth with his own hand, smiling. If it had been me on the table, I know I wouldn't have wanted someone playing with my spine.

During the procedure, off-duty staff came and went from the operating room. They told offcolor jokes, as if they were in the lounge of a local bar. Our teachers had taught us that traffic in the operating room should be kept to a minimum. Each person in the surgical suite added to the


risk of infection. When I tried to bring up the incident with my teachers and other hospital staff, they just laughed as if the whole thing were normal.

I soon learned that doctors did as they pleased. We might have been required to scrub each finger 20 times prior to an operation, but I saw many doctors simply dip their hands under the water two or three times before a procedure. Other specialists performed no better than their colleagues. I saw quite a few anesthesiologists reading the newspaper or calling their stockbrokers on the telephone during surgery. During one procedure, an OR nurse who was obviously dating the anesthesiologist showed up in our room off-duty. She sat on the doctor's lap while the circulating nurse wrapped the couple in a warm towel. While love is admirable, I hardly think the anesthesiologist's patient would have approved.

There were some operations that required the anesthesiologist to rise up out of his seat and shoot more drugs into the IV. I saw several surgeries where the patient began to stir from his or her unconscious state. Some would ask the doctor if the operation was over and attempt to get up just as the surgeon was busy manipulating the intestines or cauterizing a blood vessel. They always went back to sleep thanks to the anesthesiologist's magic bag of tricks. If the patient had any memories of the event, they were usually erased by a common medicine known as Versed.

My rotation in gynecology proved to be the most difficult for me. I dreaded working with one particular surgeon in that specialty. He had an ego the size of Texas and spent most of surgery telling everyone in the room how great his technique was compared to that of other doctors. I was just a pawn



in his OR. He took every opportunity to tell me how stupid surgical technologists were.

In preparing for most procedures, the doctor will place four blue sterilized towels around the operation site. They are held together on the patient by special clips. During vaginal hysterectomies, this surgeon bypassed the clips and stapled the towels directly to flesh. It seemed unnecessary and somewhat sadistic to my untrained eye. I had seen other doctors perform the procedure without stapling cloth to the area around a woman's vagina.

I grew to hate the doctor involved but was forced to work with him on several cases. During one operation, he complained that the needle driver was loaded incorrectly. He stopped the operation and yelled, "I'll show you how it is done!" Surgical techs have a back table where they keep instruments, precisely

placed and neatly organized for quick access. The table requires great care to set up. With one fell swoop, the surgeon ruined my table, knocking forceps and hemostats onto the floor, rendering them useless. He lectured me on how he required suture to be loaded on drivers and then continued the operation as if nothing had happened. From that point on, every time he asked for a particular instrument, I was forced to weed through the chaotic pile he had made of my equipment. This took more time than usual, and he berated me for not being fast enough. I don't know how I made it through the surgery without telling him where to stick the next retractor.

Instead of feeling more comfortable as time went on, my anxiety grew worse. Even though the hospital staff, in general, liked me, and my teachers were impressed with my performance, emotionally I was falling apart. An

intentional contamination by a doctor confirmed what I knew: This job wasn't for me. During a procedure, the surgeon handed me a very sharp instrument, a rake, backwards, so that the teeth stuck into my hand. I could have complained, but I would have been penalized and berated for accepting an instrument improperly from a doctor.

I finished my rotations and graduated with high marks. Only a few of my fellow students went on to work as techs. Most felt they were poorly prepared for the field in which they trained. I left Glendale Career College and promptly had a nervous breakdown. The experience left me psychologically and financially bankrupt. To this day, when an ad for some generic career school appears in my mail box, I tear it to shreds without reading a single word. ■

Late Arrivals

Life stumbles over its own fact, for its earlier moments plunge cease-lessly into later ones which reinterpret and correct them.

— William James

1.

Like most writers, when I'm working well, I'm in a fugue state, unaware of remembering or forgetting. In a fugue state, neuroscience tells us, one is unaware of having lost all sense of personal identity. It's also physically dissociating, dreamily so — thirty years of chronic pain subsides, as it does in beatific dreams and I'm living in lost time, in oblivion induced by the process of work. It's a form of inspiration, an auto-hypnosis instrumented by Muse or God or neural network. I get lost in the now but lost to something past, since writing is practically all recovery. I look down at whatever's under my nose, then look up and it's three or four hours later. Where have I been? In what labyrinth?

Other times I feel the utterness of the instant, its past-lessness. In a New England wood, away from traffic noise, I lie on the ground or sit on a rock. The wind blows hard; the birches, maples, and poplars rattle; leaves zip through the air, changing speed and direction with menacing quickness. In the moment, only these sensations exist. They mark the limits of consciousness and seal me in what I imagine to be the present, because they don't deliver me to any past event. But I also know it's not an eternal present, a fiction we can imagine but never experience, because there is no moment, really. The apparition of the instant is smashed by what fills it — leaves, wind, trees, a broil of pure becoming.

Another kind of oblivion, a different storminess, comes over me at my neighborhood streetcar stop in the early a.m., an ecstasy, like my moment in the woods, but induced by bodies and city engines, most of all by scents scrambled around and through the crowd. Who's wearing Chanel? What shampoo was that? Who's gusting that warm-milkand-coffee breath with hints of sugar donut? And somebody must have had licorice for breakfast. It's not at all like being in the woods, because every piece smells are like substances, with shapes, textures, weights — hinges to another experience, another story, a memory network that's already making rapidfire connections while I'm recalling what seems to be the first of such connections. But I don't experience a sequence of any kind, let alone organized. I experience only the tremendous pressure of liquid relatedness impacted, calcified, in an instant — one gulp — of time.

Now in my late 50s, I perversely want more and more what I know to be impossible: to write a poetry erased of memory that expresses only the experienced instant, a pattern of words that's just a grain of sand dropped in the eye. I'm reminded of Courbet's remark in a letter to Proudhon: "The past is useful only as education. One must use only the present in one's work. Banish the mysterious, the miraculous, don't believe in the incomprehensible." Memory: mysterious, miraculous, incomprehensible. Except that neuroscience each day comes closer to demystifying memory and describing an even greater mystery-generating grandeur living in the physiological complexities of its origins and functions. Imagine galaxy clusters as fine needlework. I've made so much for so long, to myself and to anyone who would listen, about memory's importance — Apollo stripping memory from the poet who dared to challenge the Muses, etc. — I get sick with it. When recollection drives or takes over a poem, the poem becomes nauseated by it. I tell myself I want pure breakneck invention, as if invention could be separated from recollection. Partly this comes from the middle-aged fear of waking to find I've already lived a life but haven't quite lived it out. I'm temperamentally constructed so that it would be easy to slouch into memory and lose the nervous momentum poetry feeds on, the tumbling into and through circumstance. "The way through the world," Stevens says in "Reply to Papini,"" is more difficult to find than the way beyond it." The Sirens' harp and kazoo noise lures us to the always blooming sea garden of the past, which we value because it's ours, but with that comes the cheap allure of local color, exoticism, special pleading, and bittersweet preciosity which, however true to life, have no place in real poetry. So I tell myself to put my head down and keep walking into the wind, guided by William James's pragmatic notion that thoughts are instrumental, "mental modes of adaptation to reality, rather than revelations or gnostic answers to some divinely intuited world-enigma." Everything connects or relates to something else but nothing includes or dominates everything. "The word 'and,' " James says, "trails along after every sentence.

Except for poetry grounded in Buddhist belief, instantaneity of feeling, thought, and word is an illusion, albeit a sustaining one. No such moment exists, not for a Western sensibility like mine anyway, though I can imagine its existence and even pretend that I live in a pristine moment that burns in and around me, its cool fire aloof from moments that precede or follow it. But then I catch myself and think that whatever's consequential turns on time's wheel and is an act of recovery or rec-

ollection or restoration. So much is bound up in this personal and public experience and histories and all the finely layered imagined or re-invented tissues of experience. Well, buster, throw that dust to the wind. Awareness thus purged, I'll be able to make a poetry free of memory's climates and debris, its hecatombs, bubblegum wrappers, ditties, and was that really Chanel or was it Safeway shampoo? No possibility excites me more. To live and write out of a constantly self-renewing present. Except that cognitive science tells us that such a slot in time, while we can imagine it, doesn't exist. The neuroscientist Antonio Damasio, who gives the best report of how we feel time, says: "Present continuously becomes past, and by the time we take stock of it we are in another present, consumed with planning the future, which we do on the stepping stones of the past. The present is never here. We are hopelessly late for consciousness."

2. Several years ago, working

at my desk, living with what I didn't then know were daily erosions that would result in a broken marriage and broken self, I experienced a click in consciousness, a broken circuit, on-off-on, and for an instant the ordinary involuntary momentum of sensation and thought ceased,

then just as quickly re-ignited, as if I'd lapsed into some sort of unconsciousness while still conscious. The involuntary ongoing sensation of being in a real world stopped. I was, for however long the spell lasted, dropped from time. It terrified me because it was a little total



abyss of oblivion in the normal stream of the everyday, some mysterious neural event in which millions of nerve cells, or so it felt, stopped firing.

I had a similar experience later, with a difference. Nothing tore, but I felt I'd dropped from my moment into all time, into a disorienting, undifferentiated, but unified smear in consciousness, incited by (no surprise here) a taste, which warped

me into another dimension, an experience different from Proust's spoonful of tea and Madeleine crumbs, because it didn't instrument a reinvention of lost time. It wasn't at all like the "exquisite pleasure" young Marcel took from that taste, which recalled his privileged days at Combray, a surging joy that erased his feeling of being "mediocre, contingent, mortal." Mine did the opposite, it made me feel

even more vulnerable and mortal, it didn't release a mysterious, all-powerful happiness, it shook me up, because I was certain I was sounding something foundational but unknowable. I'm not sure I even wanted to know what was waiting to be found. It was at any rate an inauspicious occasion. I tasted soy milk for the first time. Vanilla flavored. It had the kind of profound baffling familiarity that jellies your viscera and makes wakefulness itchy. but it didn't connect me to an originating event, which was long gone, I thought, so I was lost to something I'd never identify. What primed me for that? I thought it might be my old familiar, Signor Coyote, prankster imagination, drawing me into a half-lit room only to juke and mock me.

Mnemosyne. Mother of the muses. It was Mama all along, calling for me, it turned out, though la mamma vera was long dead, and not really Mama anyway but her milk, or rather not her milk because she, my actual mother, didn't breastfeed me. I was, like so many in my post-war generation, a bottle baby — it makes us sound like lab animals — and the key ingredient in formula was soy. Beckett used to say he could remember being in his mother's womb. I think we

probably all do but lack proper instruments, or Beckett's preternatural intuition, to access the sensation. (If we could, we might hate being alive and commit mass suicide.) My middleaged taste of soy delivered me back to that sucking,

brought nothing back, except the recognition. I knew little more about myself or reality than I had a minute before. But I was changed, psychically roughed-up. I'd inhaled something so deep in my being that it identified me as it, and it as me, and my passion in that instant was to recover the source. Not to do so would be to increase the ways in which I remain unknown to myself, ogling unidentifiable bits of rag and flesh and dirt and wings in Mother's silken sticky web.

We think we experience a memory as a photographic instant or cinematic sequence, but it's an illusion. The brain crafts remembrance as a composite of information networked from different regions of the cortex. Some researchers say we don't remember events, we remember remembering. The brain recovers and recalls not experience but its own re-construction of it over time. 





we use mental tricks or memory models to access past events, we're looking for ways to cue the engram. Sometimes we cue it by recalling the environment in which a memory occurred (source memory). The lack of any one or combination of these capabilities results in the many pathologies of remembrance.

So, that roll. Come si chiama? Nothing wrong with my source memory. I can practically taste the engram — creamy unsalted butter, autumns in Bologna, smells of coffee and roasting chestnuts blowing through the streets. Today's list: bread, eggs, heirlooms, and apples. Nothing wrong with what Schacter calls "episodic" memory, the recollection of a specific event or anecdote. What I fail to get is the harmonic, the set of sounds that effectively constitute the thing in my consciousness. I need help, so I go back to the baker, but she calls it by some dialect word I've never heard

Whenever I have a strong source memory but

can't remember the name of the thing in the episode, I run an exercise that combines visualization and vocalization. I start at "A" and work through the alphabet, at each letter playing sound variants — vowels, then diphthongs and consonants—off the initial, which





Some poets believe Mother Memory isn't relevant. A contemporary, responding to something I'd said in an interview, remarked not long ago that I was some kind of Wordsworthian mooncalf, that poets who think as I do are writing out of an obsolescent Romantic presupposition, that one shouldn't make such a fuss about poetry as recovered subjectivity. He had a point. Romanticism made recollection of personal experience the motor that powered the imagination, and out of that came Wordsworth's description of poetry as emotion recollected in tranquility, after the inarticulate passion of experience has cooled. But emotion, in my experience, is recollected in a state of heightened nerves or nervous anxiety. And I value other engines at least as much as memory, most of all pragmatic invention, which pistons the syntactical action that generates remembrance.

To dish memory's elaborations, falsifications, and crackpot inventiveness, along with the world of subjectivity it so critically shapes (and which shapes *it*) is to give up radical curiosity about what we are, chemically as well as spiritually. Or spiritual *because* chemical. In the past 50 years,



webbed, the brain is so much the organic locale of thought and sensation, that the body thinks, the mind feels.

When I see models or resonance imagings of the brain, I visualize sensory information of the past species past and individual past — tucked like minute flakes and dust particles within its convolutions, immateriality enfolded by spongy matter, the hiding places of our power. That's where the poet goes for the memory traces, the engrams hidden or dropped by time into those folds, which look like fissures, openings that conceal. The going is usually driven by associative sensation, which recalls to life some re-invention, reconstruction, or re-imagination of something we think once was. These recognitions then get brought over into particular words in a particular order. The pursuit isn't for the rosetta itself so much as for the episode, the chain of experiences, encoded in the emblem. Recollection compounds originating event

and times between, between it and me, then and now. The lyric is evidence of the stilled moment *and* the associative flux of experience.

I had no poetry mentors in college and was intellectually formless. I took instruction from whichever poets came my way, with little more than chronology, crude taste, and instinct to lead me. Visual artists became exemplars, too, and I wanted to emulate them, since every art — music, dance, writing — seemed to converse with some other and all were in the business of form-finding. I don't mean to dignify this. I was raw, green, muleheaded, and fearful of being found out: I was hideously unprepared for serious study and as hideously primitive in using words. But I was dog-face serious and must have cut an amusing figure. I read poets who excited me (Whitman, Crane, and Roethke early on) and was incoherently enthusiastic about the life of poetry in history and as a possible life

for myself. Close by was the Philadelphia Museum of Art, which was foundational in two ways: I got the rudiments of art history there, and it had significant holdings of artists who became big in my life, especially Paul Klee and Alberto Giacometti. They taught me more about being a poet than the poets I was reading, who taught me sounds and rhythms. I've revisited Giacometti's work many times since, but to judge by a recent experience, Klee has all along been a more insinuating presence.

When I first saw his 1938 Fish Magic (it's in Philadelphia's permanent collection) it literally pushed me back. Its mysteriousness — fishy and floral shapes and cages and nets fused to what looks like watery air somehow intensified and destabilized reality and me. I saw it again in a retrospective nearly 35 years ago, along with paintings and graphics from Klee's entire career. Nearly every picture was a hermetic culture of unexpectedness in which familiar objects were turned into



Recently, after years of pretty much ignoring his work, I saw a smallish Klee show in San Francisco which rattled me top to bottom, inside and out, not because the pictures were choice or

recalled my initiation experience in Philadelphia, but because they were a blunt unitary hit of whole body remembrance. They tripped the memory of a life — its ambition, disorder, ignorance — lived many years ago. Klee's Absorption, a comic drawing (and selfportrait), shows a square, squinty face in a state of absurdly intense concentration, maniacally serious, which I joltingly remembered myself to have been, though I certainly didn't know it at the time. The drawing was in and about my time. It seemed to be remembering itself in my moment. Most of the pictures in the show didn't just recall that gestalt, they constituted it. Losing myself to an oceanic sustained moment occasioned by a picture, I was just as much in any other discrete moment that intervened between then and now. I was delivered to myself as a young vague thing with an ambition to be a poet, who believed in pure lyric, which Fish Magic is.

The forms helped induce that swoon. Klee's line is exploratory, anxious; his colors scrim and veil the very ground they compose. He liked to say that the artist makes the invisible visible. His imagery often expresses awestruck skepticism, or skeptical awe, in the presence of a vaguely spiritualized material world. His drawing can be so scant and ephemeral that it's like a not quite recovered memory from 12 feet away marks become a faint drizzle in consciousness, the geometries and volumes so evanescent that recognizable figures come into shape and undo themselves as one pictorial action. My whole body remembrance made me think that when I'm writing I'm somehow remembering these old sources, even if I'm unaware. I'm under water and don't know I'm drowning.

certain of its occurrence. If true, it helps explain why we're the happiest and sorriest of creatures. Poetry is the deposit of such experience.

Writing this, I've some-

times felt grafted onto the tissue of the words themselves, stuck in some weird membranous mass, like a Klee invention. I kept losing my way and sense of self, all the while hoping to escape an impasse in my work and break through to I know not what, maybe to write truly off my nerves, but coherently, so that a feeling for the world of facts will be loaded into every phrase and words will be as I crudely imagined they could be when I was young — both greeting and enactment. I'd like a poetry that restores the knowledge, felt knowledge, that we're always late arriving but doing all we humanly can, hopelessly trying to be on time for consciousness. One can't plan or will any sort of poetry into existence, but one can work to be prepared, or prepare by

A friend of mine whose judgments are incorruptible says my recent books are more satisfying because more robust and immediate, while the earlier work was "sort of Symbolist." The desire for pure lyric can indeed lead to misleading heavings and sighings, and I did once want a poetry that vaporized anecdote,

that evoked, but didn't state, facts. And it's still a temptation to drift back to the old way of reducing reality to water lights. But it's only a temptation, the sort that's cousin to desperation. What I really want, if anything, is an even denser immediacy and solidity of the moment that enfold the temporal reaches of consciousness.

The challenge to this comes, as I should have foreseen, from William James, whose investigations of consciousness were always strummed by the nearness of derangement. "The moment stands and contains and sums up all things," he says, "and all change is within it, much as the developing landscape with all its growth falls forever within the rear windowpane of the last car of a train that is speeding on its headlong way. This self-sustaining in the midst of self-removal, which characterizes all reality and fact, is absolutely foreign to the nature of language." But language, I think, can act out the sensation of the moment in its fugitive changes. A fact-bound, fact-hounded poet like myself needs to be reminded that fact can be vaporous nuance, even or especially the re-confabulated facts of memory, and that the language of poetry, as hard and solid as one can make it, pursues that spirit essence.

Of Sharks and Tsunamis

f there were a remote tsunami in Japan or off the coast of Chile, it would be two to three hours or longer before it would impact the San Diego coast," says senior emergency services coordinator Susan Asturias. "The Alaska Tsunami Warning Center will call it off eventually, but typically, when they issue these warnings, they're not able to confirm whether [a tsunami] is going

to happen or not." On Saturday, July 29, the National Weather Service in San Diego will host a tsunami workshop at which representatives from the State Office of Emergency Services,

San Diego County Office of Emergency Services, and the National Weather Service will discuss the threat of

tsunamis and how to prepare for them.

"The largest tsunami we've had here was three feet...but that doesn't mean [a larger one] can't happen; we're always fighting complacency," says Asturias.

A tsunami is a series of fast-traveling waves caused by earthquakes or landslides on the ocean floor. "People who live in or frequent coastal areas need to know that if they feel shaking when they're on the beach, that's the first clue for a local tsunami and they should head inland or go as high up as soon as possible.'

According to the Office of Emergency Service's website, the largest tsunami on record for Southern California was in 1960, when waves four and a half feet tall struck the coasts of Santa Monica and Port Huen-

eme, causing major damage to harbors in Los Angeles and Long Beach.

Tsunami waves can travel up to 600 miles per hour and are likely to carry debris. The first wave is rarely the largest, and some of the last may arrive hours after the first wave hits.

For surfers and swimmers, there can be other dangers lurking about. From July 30 to August 5, the Birch Aquarium at Scripps will celebrate Shark Week with a series of shark-related activities including shark expert Dr. Jeffrey Graham's presentation Southern California Sharks.

There are nearly a dozen species of shark living off the San Diego coast. "Sharks real close to the surf zone are smoothhound and leopard sharks," says Graham. "In the kelp beds there are horn, swell, angel, and soup-fin sharks. Further offshore within a mile or two of the shoreline — are blue sharks, mako sharks, and thresher sharks. Sevengill cow sharks [which live in deeper water and can grow to be ten feet long] are famous for eating dogs," he adds. "They have interesting behaviors; they team up, get a squad together, and go after seals. A young seal and a dog might look alike to

Cow sharks may be rare in Southern California, but their seal-eating cousins, the great whites, are, according to Graham, "likely to occur close to shore in La Jolla,

where harbor seals come out of the water."

For the presentation, Graham will introduce two graduate students who will discuss their current research. One, Nick Wegner, is researching the movement patterns of make sharks.

Blue shark

"Makos are considered the fastestswimming fish in the ocean — fastest of the sharks and maybe fastest of all fish," says Wegner. "We've clocked a mako moving at 14.8 meters per second, which translates to 33 miles per hour." Makos are open-ocean fish that eat smaller fish like mackerel. Similar to threshers, makos can grow to over 1000 pounds. "A more typical shark, such as the blue shark, has reportedly reached burst speeds of about 25 miles per hour." The average swimming speed for most sharks, including mako and blue sharks, is between .60 and 1.55 miles per hour.

Wegner's fellow graduate student, Dan Cartamil, will speak about the thresher shark. "The thresher's tail is as long as the rest of their entire body," says Cartamil. 'The typical shark we'll see is two or three hundred pounds, but there are monsters out there that get up to a thousand pounds. Despite the fact they get this huge, they feed on small fish, like anchovies or sardines.

[Threshers] herd the fish into a little ball with their giant tail, and then they whack the ball of fish with their tail and stun them." Cartamil explains that threshers are the only fish to be caught by the tail, rather than the mouth, on an angler's hook. "They whack the hook with their tail."

The branches carry myriad tiny bluish fruits covered with a white powder. The fruits have traditionally been used for various drinks and preserves.

Fleas, the bane of pets and humans alike, are hopping all over San Diego again as the summer progresses. Fleas were even more troublesome in San Diego County's past than they are today. Soldiers on the Portola expedition over two centuries ago named a deserted Indian village in today's North County "Rancheria de las Pulgas," and the problem of pulgas ("fleas") in the dusty streets and dwelling places of southern California were commonly mentioned in 19th-Century journals and diaries. The place-names Las Pulgas Canyon and Las Pulgas Road in The Thin Crescent Moon returns to easy visibility in the evening sky on Thursday, July 27.

Notice how the sharp-tipped cusps point away from the sun, whose glare will be evident on the northwest horizon until well after sunset. With every passing evening, the increasingly thicker crescent moon will be spotted in twilight higher than and farther to the left of its initial position on Thursday.

The Delta Aquarid Meteor Shower, typically one of the year's ten best showers, embelishes the dark, early-morning sky during July's final week. In the hour or two before dawn (no later than 4:30 a.m.) on the peak morning of July 28, you should see about 10-20 meteors under clear, unobstructed skies, as long as you are far from city lights.




ranklin Canyon Ranch, a patch of open space north of Beverly Hills, belongs to a sprawling assemblage of interconnected parklands called the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. Without the benefit of administrative protection, much more of Los Angeles's canyon and mountain open spaces in the Santa Monicas would surely have succumbed by now to housing developments for the wealthy.

Franklin Canyon is worth a look around, perhaps before or after touring Beverly Hills itself. Go north on Beverly Drive — but be careful to fork left on the lesser-traveled north end of Beverly Drive where the main Coldwater Canyon Drive goes straight. After 0.8 mile, bear right on narrow Franklin Canyon Drive. Go 1.2 miles farther along the canyon side to Lake Drive. Turn $\,$

right and backtrack 0.3 mile south to a small parking area. The Hastain Trail begins there, on the left. (It is also possible to reach Lake Drive and the Hastain Trail by driving south from Mulholland Drive on Franklin Canyon Drive.)

From the parking area, walk the twisting Hastain Trail (a fire road) 0.9 mile along chaparralcovered slopes to a hairpin turn (980 feet elevation) with a panoramic view of the city. Looking over green-mantled Beverly Hills estates and the office towers and condominiums of the Wilshire corridor, you can sometimes see a blue horizon beyond.

From the hairpin turn, the fire road continues climbing toward Coldwater Canyon Drive. You veer

From the ranch house you can walk back to your car on either of two trails that parallel Lake Drive. The trail on the right passes under a shady canopy of live oak, while the trail on the left meanders among scattered oaks and sycamores down along Franklin Canyon's usually dry stream bed.


For additional hiking in the area, try following the Cross Mountain Trail, which leads one mile north to Mulholland Drive. You can also walk or drive

around placid Upper Franklin Canyon Reservoir, visit a tiny duck pond adjoining it on the west dubbed "Heavenly Pond." and/or check out the exhibits at the nearby Douglas Nature Center.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE AUTHOR:

"Adam, how did you meet the boxer Jesus Chavez?"

"In 1999, I was a cub reporter at the *Dallas Observer*, a street weekly. I was on the job maybe three days and a lady walked in, asking if she could speak to the youngest sports writer on staff. She told me the story of a boxer with the ring name of Jesus Chavez. It was compelling. I pitched it to my editor and was on a plane to Mexico City. From there I went overland to the tiny town of Delicias. He and I met, and we've been friends ever since."

"What so caught your imagination that you had to meet him and years later write a whole book about him? Who is 'El Matador'?"

"He was born Gabriel Sandoval, in the Mexican town where Pancho Villa was killed and buried. He was raised in Delicias, where his grandfather and father worked as miners 3100 feet under the earth. It was gainful employment, but it destroyed your health. The area was impoverished. Gabriel's father wanted more for his familv. His father's brother carried 7vear-old Gabriel on his shoulders across the Rio Grande into the U.S., while his mom pulled his sister across on an inner tube. It was the second attempt to save the family from the grinding poverty at home."

"They were illegal aliens?"
"Yes," says Adam. "Undocumented."

"And then?"

"They settled in Chicago. There young Gabriel, 10, happened upon a grimy gym named

The Matador by its operator, a young ex-teacher who taught ghetto kids to box, to keep them off the mean streets of the infamous Westside. Gabriel was fabulous at it. He learned fast and refused to back down, even when he was outweighed or outclassed. He showed real courage. He didn't like to fight so much as he liked to compete and win. He won three Golden Glove titles, had a record of 95 wins and 5 losses as an amateur, so the trainer initiated serious contacts with Mexican boxing people to get Gabriel a tryout for their next Olympic team."

"Gabriel's still in high school at this point," I chime in.

"Yeah, 112 pounds and 16 years old. He was handsome, funny, witty, and on the way to great things, but getting distracted by the Harrison Gents."



"Who were they?"

"A street gang of kid career criminals. Gangbangers. They loved Gabriel's reputation and local celebrity, and lured him in. One of them shows up on a sunny day with an umbrella. In it is a sawed-off shotgun. Gabriel was enlisted as the lookout at a holdup.

"Was it foiled?" I ask.

"No, they pulled it off, but someone must have bragged or ratted. They were busted. Gabriel went to jail, sentenced to 7 years. Just a tragedy. But he promises his father he'll be champion of the world someday and make him proud yet. In prison, he worked out every waking moment in his cell, tied garbage bags filled with water to the ends of a broomstick and used them as free-weights. At night, he would fight his silhouette, sometimes all night. Meanwhile, his exemplary family gained permanent-resident

status, thanks to Reagan's Immigration Reform and Control Act. They were on their way to becoming citizens even as their eldest endured prison."

'How long did he serve?" "He was paroled after four years and released. That was the good news. But as soon as he was out, he was handcuffed and taken to O'Hare International and deported."

'That must have been crushing.

"His father intercepted him in Mexico. By then dad had a green card. He and Gabriel bluffed their way back across the border. Every year 70,000 Mexicans were caught and sent back, but that day father and son made it and flew home to Chicago for a reunion of the family. From there Gabriel went to a relative in Austin. He found Richard Lord's gym and literally took up residence. Gabriel, right out of prison, was slow and heavy: 160 pounds. In great shape but smoking two packs a day. The skills were evident, though. He went to work to regain his form."

I laugh. "This is where it turns into a movie.

The author laughs, too. "Yeah. Gabriel became a local hero. He took the ring name of Jesus Chavez, "El Matador" (for his Chicago gym), and won consistently. A guy named Richard Garriott befriends him, an unconventional computer genius who had dropped out of high school and become a millionaire. Gabriel slept on a worn mattress in the stuffy boxing gym; Garriott, in his marvel of a house, in a huge bed that lifted through his roof so he could sleep under the stars. The two were friends."

'And then?'

"Gabriel meets a college student, Terri, a nice Jewish girl from a traditional upper-middle class family. He falls totally for Terri. They're inseparable. And she falls in love with Jesus Chavez, the ex-con deportee, illegal immigrant, professional boxer, and Roman Catholic.

"Hmm. Who would play

"It seemed like a nice Jewish girl's parents' worse night-

mare. But Gabriel was so charming, her family just loved him. In fact, it was her mother who sought me out later to help him."

"So," I prompt, "dreams are coming true."

"Yes. On top of friendship and romance, three years after getting out of prison, Gabriel wins the North American Federation Super Featherweight Championship. Everyone is stunned and weeping with joy. A national title. He is ranked fifth in the world. This puts him next in line to face the WBC featherweight champion. He defends his own title four times and dreams of capturing the other championship belt."

"But another hitch develops," I comment. "It came out that he was undocumented. He was deported all over again, back to his hometown in Mexico and his grandparents."

"Which is where I found him in 1999," says Adam, "training alone in a dilapidated gym underneath the bleachers of a small stadium. There was no ring, just a concrete square. He couldn't

even spar, and he was alone."

. "Normally when a boxer trains, how many people are involved in supporting him?"

"A trainer. Often a fitness or strength coach. Sparring partners. Between 5 to 15 people at a training camp for a serious fight. He had none of that. He had to do it all himself."

"He's down there nearly 4

"Right," says Adam. "And all of the boxing action is up in the States, except he does have one significant fight with the Mex-

ican national champ. And beats him and wins over his countrymen."

"Afterward a brilliant lawyer found a loophole and Gabriel returned to the U.S. legally."

Yes, for the first time he crossed the border legally. And by then his father was a citizen and simply sponsored him."

"How old is he, in boxing terms, when he comes back at that time?"

'Getting up there: 28. He's lost roughly eight years: four in prison, four exiled in Mexico. But

Heritage of the Americas Museum, more than 100 Chinese jades of the Late Neolithic (4300-2500 B.C.) through the Ming periods (A.D. 1368-1644) are included in "The Stone of Heaven: The Enduring Art of Jade Age China." From ancient times, iades in China were treasured as talismans, worn on the body either as final adornments in death or as ornaments in life. See a rare and valuable jade burial suit of the Han dynasty (206 B.C.-A.D. 221), one of only about two dozen that have been excavated in China. The suits were made of more than 2000 square and rectangular plates of jade sewn together with threads of gold, silver, or bronze (depending upon the status of the wearer). Ongoing.



he's boxing in the States again, and once again he fights his way into the top ranks. Then, the big title fight was scheduled in San Francisco. Mayweather, his opponent, is undefeated, and may be the best pound-for-pound boxer in the world. He's fluid, technically accomplished, and has ferocious punching power.'

'But Gabriel wins!" "No, it's a great fight, he's doing great, but he loses. His new trainer throws in the towel

in the ninth round. Technically a

knockout. Richard Lord is apoplectic, but there's nothing to be done.

"Maybe life isn't like the movies," I observe.

"And he and his girl split up." "Get out!"

'Gabriel's next big bout is with Singmanassuk, the Thai boxer who holds the World Boxing Confederation super featherweight title. The opponent is 26 and in great shape, with a record of 39 wins and 1 loss. Gabriel -Jesus Chavez - is 31 years old. The Thai fought well, Gabriel fought brilliantly. And won. El Matador was a champion once again.

"That would have been a great ending," I say, "but boxing goes on. Boxers don't stop.'

'The next name opponent is Erik Morales, 'El Terrible,' who is pursuing a third championship in a different weight class. Only one other fighter had done that. The fight was savage. In the second round, Gabriel tears his rotator cuff and separates his right shoulder, gets knocked down twice, and proceeds to box the next 11 rounds left handed. He throws 856 left-handed punches, 17 with his right. He won't quit. He goes the distance and loses the decision, of course. Both fighters are battered. Like a lot of the Mexican fighters, Gabriel doesn't move his head in the ring. He just takes the punches. Morales, it turns out, has broken both his hands on Gabriel's head.

"Things do get better," I say. "He meets Aunisa Stroklund in a Barnes and Noble in Austin.'

"She's a graduate of the University of Montana and a lieutenant in the Texas Army National Guard. Yes, they become an item.'

"So the last loss was a huge disappointment for Jesus Chavez. I say, picking up the storyline. "And it gets worse. A year after losing to Morales, Gabriel is fighting in Las Vegas again, but this time there is scant publicity, even though it's a championship fight. His is the third bout on the card, against International Boxing Federation lightweight champion Leavander Johnson. It's the first

fight televised on HBO's payper-view programming and starts at 6 p.m., mountain time"

"Gabriel did really well. The referee stopped the fight in the 11th round. Jesus 'El Matador' Chavez dethroned Johnson and was the IBF champion. Victory. **Except Leavander Johnson was** rushed to the hospital, suffering from a subdural hematoma. I was sitting there watching it happen and didn't know it. None of us did. Johnson had left the ring on his own power. They operated, but he died five days later."

"What a story," I said. "The life of the boxer is almost manic."

"It's really played on him psychologically. I remember, right before a big fight, someone wished him luck, and a fan said, 'I'll be praying for you in there.' And he replied, 'I'll be praying for both of us. I don't want to hurt anyone.' That's the type of guy he is. Leavander Johnson's father told him he's not to blame, that he should go on and keep fighting. He welcomed Gabriel at his son's funeral in Atlantic City.

"I'll be praying for both of us. I don't want to hurt anyone."

During the service, Jesus Chavez was asked to stand, and the congregation applauded him in support. But at the same time, it's still weighing on him."

"What's he doing now?" "He lives in a very modest ranch-style home in a workingclass neighborhood of North Austin. He married his girlfriend. She was serving in Iraq at the time of the Johnson fight."

"Is he still training? "Well, he's trying to recover from this shoulder injury. His goal is to get back in the gym and start training. It just hasn't happened yet. Part of that could very well be because of the emotional burden, or maybe he is trying to postpone the inevitable."

"How many years do you think he has left?"

"I can't see him going more than another year. The body is just not healing right. He was always a fast healer. Thirty-three is not necessarily a dinosaur, but in boxing years...it's like dog years. It's getting up there."

"What do you wish for

"I don't want to see him be one of these guys fighting well into his mid to late 30s and starting to show the symptoms of a long boxing career, like the loss of memory and judgment. I guess the short answer to that is hopefully not more than another year.'

"How," I ask, "has Leavander Johnson's death affected him most?

> "He hasn't fought since." Juris Jurievics

Concurrently, see "The History of Commercial Aviation in America." A new section of the exhibit celebrates the 40-year history of PSA, with original graphics, a recreation of the airline's first ticket booth at Lindbergh Field, and uniforms and memorabilia donated by former employees. Ongoing.

"P-51 Mustang" celebrates the legendary Air Force fighter used during both World War II and Korea. The museum's Mustang is painted in the red-tail livery of the Tuskegee Airmen, who distinguished themselves flying bomber

Sorbet Palette

"I paint what I like, where I like, and when I like."

he English painter David Hockney was no stranger to Los Angeles when he made it his permanent residence in 1978. Friendships and exhibitions had brought him there often, but his off-and-on romance with the place

and its color-style, the phantasmagorical hues from which he partly derived what the critic Sarah Highgate calls his "sorbet palette," finally persuaded him to

stay. For all he has absorbed of his Southland milieu, he remains an English, or more broadly, a European artist, in thrall from his beginnings to Pablo Picasso and for a long time loosely affiliated with an older generation of London-based painters that included Francis Bacon, Lucian Freud, Frank Auerbach, and (American-born) R.B. Kitaj. Hockney works in a realist, figurative tradition, and his practice has been as classical as it gets: portraiture, landscape, and still life. Born in 1937 into a working-class culture in Yorkshire, he has found a way, in his best work, of blending realist immediacy with California dreaming.

Among Hockney's first pictures (made at the age of 18) was a 1955 portrait of his father and a self-portrait from the year before, both included in the big, baggy retrospective, *David Hockney Portraits*, which I saw last fall in Boston and which is currently at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. He already had a deft touch and used the brush or pencil to coax personality from his sitters, to *characterize* them, and he has put his hand to nearly every medium: oil and acrylic paint, pencil, charcoal, pastel, lithography, etching, even

photographic collage. That 1954 self-portrait I mentioned is constructed of sliced-up bits of canvas and paper collaged on newsprint. He would go on to make dozens of other self-portraits, most of which depict him studying himself in the inquisitive act of making a picture.

quisitive act of making a picture. The 1954 painting shows him dealing with Picasso's influence, using mixed media to create planar surfaces that recall Cubism.

And, like Picasso, he has developed a feisty, dexterous line and has a similar voraciousness for human semblance and at-hand materials. In 1990, for instance, he made digital photo portraits of everyone who visited his home in the Hollywood Hills, all 110 of them, including the director of the Getty Center and the guy who maintains Hockney's swimming pool.


In a 1973 drawing titled Artist and Model, a naked Hockney, sporting only his signature round-framed eyeglasses, sits across a table from a Picasso dressed in his trademark sailor's shirt, who holds what seems to be a page from a sketch book. Hockney shyly stares past him, as if at something waiting to be found beyond the master, while Picasso nails him with what everybody who knew him described as his pitiless, small, black eyes. It's an image of a master deliberating on the quality of a terribly exposed acolyte's work. As he matured, Hockney pushed in his own directions. In a 1977 painting, Self-Portrait with Blue Guitar, he vaporizes Picasso's Cubist planes and turns them into abstract structures sailing in architectural spaces, which brings this and sim-

ilar pictures closer to collage or assemblage than to Cubism's angular, analytical permutations of volume. In his more naturalistic portraits, Hockney handily frees himself of Picasso's influence by anatomizing the textures of flesh, textiles, and decoration, breaking down their surfaces into tight hatchings and rainy separations of brushstrokes.

Hockney is a better draftsman than colorist, though he has coined a unique, recognizable vision of L.A.'s palette - aqueous, glassily opaque, sun-hazed indoors or out. In his paintings up till the 1990s, his surfaces have a flipped-over quality, the color aerated, diaphanous, a little drained of affect but crisped by precise, luminous edges. Since 1989, he has cultivated a more sensuous handling with open, broken brushwork that shows fiercer, more concentrated attack. He has become less reserved in scrutinizing his sitters' emotional exposure and his own relation to it, and the structure of the pictures follows this loosening. Ĉompare the totemic verticals of American Collectors (1968) with its two figures, tree, sculpture, and actual totem rigidly deployed across a schematized array of framings (windows, doorway, rooflines), each stiff "collector" set in a different pictorial zone, to the much later double portrait Martin Kemp and Marina Wallace (2003), which is wobbly, casual, and oblique in its view of the subjects. The continuity between these pictures is that the two figures in each, while set close together in space, are as psychologically adrift as figures in any of Degas's disassociated group portraits. Unlike, say, the many Dutch baroque pictures of stable husband-wife pairs, Hockney, loyal to the modern theme, is more interested in difficulty and impermanence, in what comes and goes. Someone once commented that his many double portraits are like Annunciations: "There's always somebody who looks permanent and somebody who's kind of visiting.'

A gay artist who frequently treats gay subjects, Hockney certainly isn't the first artist to depict explicit homosexual Eros. In the 1930s and 1940s, photographers like Herbert List and George Platt Lynes were making artful — "arty" is closer — images of young male nudes, usually in bed, but these weren't exhibited until many years later. And the randy, carnivalesque watercolors Charles Demuth made in the early 1930s, of sailors cavorting (exposed penises and all) on beaches with "the boys," stayed in the closet for a long time. Hockney made

his first gay painting, Queer, while still a 23-year-old art student and in 1966 illustrated, with a kind of lubricious tenderness, a set of poems by the homosexual Alexandrian poet C.P. Cafavy. Many of the portraits featuring homosexual friends and lovers are fleshy bonbons full of fondly depicted, firm, youthful buttocks displayed on beds or in pools. Gay pairings of different emotional temperatures and erotic tensions have been a constant theme, from the monumentalized 1968 Christopher Isherwood and Don Bachardy to the 2002 Sully Bonnelly and Robert Littman, where both stylish, middle-aged subjects dangle their hands at their spread crotches.

Early in his career, Hockney remarked: "I paint what I like, where I like, and when I like." And, he might have added, with whatever materials he likes. His early interest in collage, for instance, resurfaced years later with experiments in photo-collage. His scissored-up sequence of Billy Wilder lighting a cigar is among the exhibition's wittiest surprises. Hockney's intent in this and other such works was to

create a visual field of moments lived through by the same person, a kind of stutter-step composite of someone performing a single activity. It was a way of achieving sequential likenesses in one instant. He has tried other means to achieve likeness but has also admitted, "I don't really like struggling for likeness." What matters is personality, composition, tonal expressiveness, relatedness the portrait as a way of greeting (or meeting) reality. In 1999, while drawing guards at the National Gallery, London, he began to use a camera lucida, an instrument that lets an artist use an image refracted through a lens as a template for drawing people quickly and accurately. (Ingres used the camera lucida to achieve his exquisite likenesses.) Hockney's curiosity about historical technologies resulted in his controversial 2001 book, Secret Knowledge, which tried to prove that the old masters often arrived at their graphic exactitude of perspective and detail by virtue of mechanical devices. The book, if nothing else, makes it clear that Hockney believes it was technical questions that drove artists to reveal more about the nature of physical reality, that art, in other words, isn't what theorists call a social construct or issue-driven "hegemonic" implement.


Hockney has certainly emulated Picasso's restlessness. He continues to test new media and techniques. The LACMA exhibition demonstrates that "affect," the running current of feeling, as it appears in his drawings and photographic collages, lies entirely in figuration, the sharp delineation of expressiveness and response. The paintings, on the other hand, subtle in colorist dynamics as they sometimes are, tend to be more affectless in their presentation of subject: we see Hockney instead thinking his way through formal problems. The paintings are more meditative and coolly self-possessed. But whatever one thinks of Hockney's achievement, through all his years of seeking he has kept a certain faith. "I'm quite convinced painting can't disappear, because there's nothing to replace it," he has said. "The photograph isn't good enough. It's not real enough."■





"Sicko Records Runs San Diego," says Sicc
Made of the label founded by
Southeast San Diego rapper
Lil Uno. "We are all over the

Boy Scouts," a dig against the Sicko artist roster, which is nicknamed "Sicko Camp."

Next month, the label plans to release the localartist compilation *Heat Rocks*, the fifth to include Sicc Made's music.

"People get upset because I'm on Sicko Records," says Sicc Made, who describes

radio. We perform at car shows in front of 2000 people. They see our CDs on the top shelf of FYE and Tower Records across the U.S."

Still, says Sicc Made, the label has its detractors.

"One local artist who used to be on Sicko said in an interview that camping is for himself as half-Irish/half-Cherokee. "They look at this white boy and say, 'Hey, who is this?' I had to let them know that a white boy has raps too....

"They feel [Sicko] should be strictly a Latin label with strictly Hispanics.... I grew up in East San Diego in a Latin community. My stepfather is black. I grew up hanging around Mexicans. My family is mostly black. I got exposed to a lot of things....

"People tell me I will have a hard time, that I won't sell any records, that I'm barking up the wrong tree. While they keep barking, I'm still rising. I've been doing this for ten years."

Sicc Made does rap about artists who have crossed the Sicko label, but he doesn't use their names.

"I speak in general terms. If somebody is reading this and they know in their heart they did this, then they know I'm shooting at them."

Get a Better Agent, Mikey Rock 105.3's Mikey
Esparza once called members of a local Hispanic band "beaners" on the air and was once suspended after making a joke about the murder of a young girl ("...that's why I don't use duct tape; I use

nylon rope"). Six months after Howard Stern left "terrestrial" airwaves for satellite radio, Esparza seems to have won most local Stern listeners.

In the latest quarterly Arbitron ratings, Mikey's

morning yackfest is number one in the 18–34 demographic. Local radio listeners in that age range prefer talk over music in the morning; Arbitron says the "music intensive" FM-94/9 morning show comes in 7th place while the music-and-talk *Cantore in the Morning* show on 91X comes in at

13th place.

"I guess it helps if you have Jesus on your side," says a DJ whose program airs during the same time slot as Esparza's. "He even has a billboard that says 'Christian.' "Rock 105.3 paid for outdoor advertising that included one-word descriptions of Esparza next to his photo. On the air, Esparza talks about his religious beliefs and how he is recovering from substance abuse.

Should Mikey Show ratings hold, insiders speculate that pay for the crew of six will be increased when their contract comes up for renewal. One radio executive estimates that talent for competing morning-radio talk shows Dave, Shelly, and Chainsaw and Jeff and Jer each get compensated between \$5 million and \$7 million per year. The executive says Rock 105.3 is getting a bargain; he estimates The Mikey Show people are guaranteed \$1 million a year or less.

Though Dave, Shelly, and Chainsaw and Jeff and Jer continue to be number one and two among listeners in the older 25–54 age range, the programs don't generate the

huge ratings they did in past years.

Meanwhile, radio insiders wonder how long Stern's replacement on Free FM (103.7) can last. The L.A.-based *Adam Carolla Show* is in 18th place among 18–34 listeners and in 22nd place among those aged 25–54. Free FM (formerly called the Planet) is now all talk. Stern's replacement on the East Coast, David Lee Roth, has already been yanked off the air

Shhh... "We are being 'hush hush' because if word gets out, this could muster competition and that would be bad," says Todd Urick of his hope to launch "a local community radio station. Not a pirate station; a real one, with serious watts that can get the signal far and wide." Urick claims to have heard that, later this year ("no one knows when exactly"), the FCC will offer public entities and private nonprofit community organizations a one-time, five-day window to apply for a full-power FM radio license, and San Diego is one of the few cities with potential bandwidth.

"I talked to Activist San Diego about all of this stuff; they got a prelim study done, and there is a frequency available," says Urick, whose past broadcasting endeavors include stints as both engineer and manager at KDVS, a 9200-watt free-form radio station near Sacramento. His nonprofit group(www.commonfrequency .org) hopes to raise money for a proposed indie FM station that would broadcast from atop a mountain in northern San Diego. "The FCC hasn't announced anything yet, [but] people into alternative media really need to get organized to make this thing happen." The big thing is getting the associated filing costs together." He expects those costs to total around

"Viking on the Mountaintop

petitioning the gods" is how Frank Melendez describes the sound of Riververb, his one-man experimental noise band. After watching him set up and suit up, his seven-word description makes sense. He has a full-sized drum kit, a homemade bass guitar built from a 20-gallon oil drum, a foot-controlled synthesizer. and effects pedals. He plugs everything into an 800-watt amplifier and then straps on a helmet that has a built-in microphone.

"The microphone is made

from a set of headphones," says Melendez. "I just cut up a pair of headphones where one of the speakers was blown and bolted it to the front of this helmet. My girlfriend has this collection of deer antlers, so I mounted some of those to the top and painted it.'

With the helmet strapped on, Melendez looks like a postapocalyptic warrior. He carries a drumbeat and bangs a stick on the bass while standing on a weird synthesizer. The sound is a mix of feedback, thumping beats, and space-age/UFO effects. Melendez has been a singer, bassist, guitarist, and drummer in "traditional" bands.

"For years I've been pursuing the family-unit style of band and ended up



frustrated because of flakey fuckers," he says. "The reason I started Riververb was because the band I was in had a show booked with Graves at Sea, which is a pretty big metal band. They flaked on practices about six times in two weeks. I said, 'Fuck you,' and changed the flier and did the show myself.'

Barrabee, bassist for the Long and Short of It, is paralyzed from the chest down. He's been in a wheelchair since May 2004, the victim of a hotel-room accident. He explains how he was recently burned in a Modesto hotel room.

"I wasn't paying attention. The bathtub filled up with boiling water. By the time I noticed, I saw my feet were really red. I had third-degree burns.... I knew by reading the Web that my life was not in danger and that I didn't have to go to the hospital. We found out you shouldn't use ice, that you should use cold water and then wrap [the burned area] up in this cream wound protector and gauze."

Barrabee says he went to the emergency room after their Arcata show. The incident did not interrupt his band's 15-city tour.

'We never came across a venue that was hard to access. We played upstairs in Santa Cruz, but it was totally wheelchair accessible.... I understand the novelty of this, but I don't want this to

be a part of our identity as a band. We're doing everything now that we would have done before the accident except I sit down when I play instead of standing up....

"There is one guy who does a one-man act in a wheelchair. But I'm the only

guy I know of in a wheelchair who goes out and tours with a band.... There is no way I could do this without the help and support of my bandmates. But I don't even think about it anymore. They fixed up the van so I could get in and out easily. I don't think about it at all when I'm playing....

The current band lineup (Barrabee, vocalist Ben Johnson, drummer Tim Johnson, and guitarist Matt Strachota) has been the same for three years.

Barrabee, who used to work in the food industry, no longer holds down a day job. He books shows for the band. Does he expect to be in a wheelchair for the rest of his life?

"That won't change unless someone else gets elected in the White House."

"We just weren't covering our costs if a band didn't draw a lot of people. And we had a few bands that could draw 140 people, but they wouldn't be comfortable because the place isn't big enough. If 300 people showed up, paying \$6 a head, then everyone would be happy. We ended up paying the bands a buck a head for anyone that walked in the door.

"I understand how frustrating it can be for a band. I play saxophone. I know that a lot of practice goes into learning songs. A lot of the stories that came out weren't telling our side of things, and some bands I contacted to explain the situation didn't want to discuss it. I don't have experience running a venue, just a coffeehouse.

Right after the owner unplugged me, another intoxicated patron lamented that he couldn't believe he turned the Rolling Stones off the jukebox for me."

The Grateful Dead have always reminded me of a bunch of housecats. I read something that said that felines have a sort of "pleasure center" in their brains that they can call upon to release a hormone that makes them feel good. Cats like to "go there" a lot, the article said. The thing about the Dead and their lifestyle and their music was that it all seemed to hone right in on those same kinds of hormonal good feelings. I believe that they liked to go there a lot as well, whether by natural or artificial means.

Bob Weir had to have noticed that same pleasure-center vibe going strong when he sat in with Tea Leaf Green last year during their set at the Rainforest Action Network benefit. And why not? Tea Leaf Green would not be the first band from San Francisco to have metabolized the Dead's musical bag-Singer/songgage. writer/keyboardist Trevor Garrod admits to having been a Grateful Dead fan from junior high. I suppose you could criticize Garrod for being derivative. So be it. The Dead's influence is they pervasive helped create a genre and in so doing imprinted themselves on the sound of California rock forever.

Tea Leaf Green has approached the sound of the Keith and Donna Godchaux years (minus Donna's pitch problems) with their split-octave vocals, deliberate guitars, and wandering electronic keyboards. There's a modern iam-band feel to some of the instrumentals, but the Green take fewer musical risks than their Dead predecessors (who could be the best band you ever heard, or the

TEA LEAF GREEN worst). Hence, Tea Leaf Green's music is far less variable. They simply channel an era. "Got a little bit of soul," Garrod sings. "Got a little bit of rock 'n' roll in my bones / Don't you bury me when I'm old / I may need 'em

Every band likes to say it doesn't fit into an easy pigeonhole, but when you get down to it, most of them do. The Dresden Dolls really don't fit in anywhere. The Boston-based duo of pianist-vocalist Amanda Palmer and drummer **Brian Viglione** is too cabaret to be rock, too rock to be cabaret. They're independent but not indie. With their dark duds and weakness for pancake makeup. Palmer and Viglione could easily fit in at a Bauhaus reunion gig, but their own music is far too goofy for Goth. They are signed to the same label as Slipknot, Nickelback, and the reunited New York Dolls, but it's hard to imagine the Dresden Dolls sharing a stage with any of these acts without causing a riot.

Lucky for the Dresden Dolls, they live in an age of niche markets. If you're good at what you do whether you're fashionable or not — you can put it on the Internet and someone out there will appreciate it. The only problem is making enough money to live on. The Dresden Dolls are very good at what they do: Palmer belts out twisted, clever, humorous lyrics that always contain a kernel of profundity; Viglione is

one of those rare drummers who can pound fiercely but knows not to get in the way of

They have also learned how to build a community with their fans by, among other things, inviting burlesque dancers and more esoteric performance artists to join them at their shows. Certainly the community helps



with the money-making, but it also seems genuinely like the product of a bunch of people who don't fit in suddenly finding a group of people who feel the same way.

Switchblades, rolled-up Levis, and greased-back hair...rockabilly is what the Buzzbombs are all about. Track 5, "Pintail," is an instrumental in the

fashion of the old tune "Tequila." The song features a guitar riff inherited from Dick Dale and a pause before they all shout, "Beer! _!" (where Cigarettes!

is a female body part that shares its name with the common housecat). Simple, yes. Dumb, yes. But that doesn't mean it isn't fun.

You can't go wrong with a style of music that was perfected half a century ago. The Buzzbombs don't deviate from the model: standup bass, twanging Chuck Berry guitar, banging drums, and the raucous vocals and lyrics that were meant to piss off school principals.

The songs are literal and bare. Track 2 is about a hotrod girl. Track 3 is, indeed, about truck-driving vampires. Track 1 borrows a line from "Blue Suede Shoes" and alters it a bit, "One for the money / Two for the show / Go to the store / Get some more / Beer and cigarettes!"

In a lighthearted beach

"A cat may look at a king," wrote Lewis Carroll in

His royal interior was furnished in dark woods, crystal chandeliers, red-tufted leather-upholstered chairs, bone china, heavy silver — all as stuffy, masculine, and high-maintenance as the dining room at Camelot, although almost certainly warmer in winter. The menu was no less luxuriously gout-inducing: Beef Wellington, Prime-grade steaks, Dover sole boned at table, Caesar salad.

Last winter, the Del's newest owners (a hotel compendium) hired one of America's top restaurant and food consultants, Clark Wolf, to start all over with the Prince. Following his advice, the Del's management decided to knock out the wall to let in sunshine, sand-dune views, and sea breezes. They changed the restaurant's name to 1500 Ocean and hired renowned chef Jason Schaeffer to create a sprightly new menu for the 21st Century, centering on a Southern California identity, showcasing ingredients raised or caught from Santa Barbara to the tip of Baja, delivered fresh six days a week. Since reopening at the beginning of May, the food now epitomizes the current lighter, cleaner style of luxury cuisine, with superb ingredients in flavor combinations that enhance rather than mask each other.

Setting the stage for the new menu, Marin County designer Jennifer Johansen renovated the newly opened space to match the "green cuisine." She combined neutrals and blues to accent the "ocean palate" and replaced the wall behind the bar with glass colored the fiery reds and oranges of a sunset over the sea. If you sit inside (why, I don't know, unless it's pouring out), you'll be ensconced on a wooden throne upholstered in teal leather. Outside, you'll relax on the shaded dining patio in a captain's chair, watching little birds snacking at the

feeders posted on the palms and people tossing Frisbees on the beach. Between the updated decor and fresh culinary concepts, the old Prince has shed his ermines and taken holiday on the Riviera.

As you look over the menu, a bread plate ap pears, with fresh-baked drop

cheese biscuits (resembling your mom's Bisquick creations) and crusty sourdough torpedoes catered by Compane, a small bak-

ery in Point Loma. We ate early, and the premium, lightly salted Straus Family butter arrived ice cold, alas — but the table setting includes a salt saucer with a yin-yang design of red Hawaiian sea salt and lavender-tinted French fleur du sel, both so scrumptious they're worth their weight in sodium. The waiters are attentive, friendly, and craftsmanly but don't hover like news helicopters — they're there only when you want them.

The bill of fare opens with the chef's tasting, then moves as you'd expect to beginnings, mains, and "accents" — additional vegetable dishes, although all entrées, even steaks, come with veggies here, since the chef likes to control the combinations on each plate.

I ordered the tasting, including matched wines, while my partner chose from the regular menu. Our waiter pointed out that we wouldn't be eating in sync, since the taster has numerous small plates — but nobody objects if you share a mix'n'

match dinner. In fact, our waiter seemed pleased: "More people should eat like that," he said.

The tasting menu offered two appetizers, starting with an

optional Sonoma foie gras terrine (for a \$15 surcharge) — a silky, ethereal mousse to spread like butter on the accompanying toasted brioche bread. It came with local Crow's Pass Farm strawberry marmalade and purée (peaches are now replacing the out-of-season berries). The wine pairing was Thornton Brut from Temecula, which proved an instant education for me. I've never cozied up to real Champagne — too steely and bubbly for me — but the Thornton tasted mellow and a bit oaky, with bubbles as gentle as a Prosecco or a naturally sparkling Vouvray. This and all other pours were generous.

"Bubalus Bubalis buffalo ricotta gnudi" arrived next on the taster. "Bubalus" is Latin for water



buffalo, the source of the California cheese enclosed in the gnudi — thin-skinned dumplings resembling ricotta-filled dim sum. This isn't my first taste of gnudi, but it's the best I can remember. The ricotta tastes fresh and sunny, and the Meyer lemon sauce that robed the spheres was so flawless a match that I wanted to lick the plate. This dish came with a vina nora albariño, a steely, straightforward Spanish white that cleansed the palate like Evian water.

My partner began with an appetizer of limeand honey-cured yellowtail, a type of jackfish that sushi-lovers know as hamachi. The firm, tasty fish arrives sliced like sashimi, along with avocado mousse, jicama and radish slices, and a daub of

mild jalapeño jelly. "Taste them all at once, all the flavors will come together in harmony, said our waiter. We followed his instructions, making a jellyroll of all the garnishes on a slice of fish. We found this combination too sweet for our tastes. On the second round, we omitted the iam and much preferred the result. You can choose from eight other starter choices, including grilled hearts of romaine with smoked paprikamarinated calamari and Spanish piquillo peppers, and "toad in the hole": an organic poached egg in a nest of brioche with wild mushrooms and asparagus tips.

The tasting selection includes both a fish and a meat entrée chosen by the chef. The herb-crusted Pacific halibut recreates a popular dish that chef Shaeffer cooked at Laurel. A thick chunk of flaky halibut (some sections more tender than others) came with haricots verts (young green beans), pickled radish, braised scallions, and a light cream sauce studded with black Italian truffle shavings (at my visit they were canned; by now, expect fresh summer truffles). The truffles filled out the flavor, which might otherwise have been pallid. (That's halibut for you.) The wine that normally comes with this entrée is Zaca Mesa Chardonnay — a big, firm, leggy classic from the Central Coast. But since that was the same wine I'd enjoyed for my aperitif, the sommelier substituted a glass of Talbott (which costs \$2 more by the glass when ordered à la carte). If ZM is straight-ahead and zesty, the Talbott is rich and eccentric, with a nose of flowers growing in well-aged horse manure and legs like Nicole Kidman. It was a treat, and I appreciated the sommelier's consideration in providing a fresh taste treat.

The second main course was a natural certified Angus beef rib coulotte, the top strip of a prime rib that usually gets roasted well-done but is delicious anyway. I ordered it very rare, and so it arrived. It came with a tiny pastry filled with sinful, fatty beef marrow and a heap of golden potato mousseline (mash plus whipped cream) dotted with fresh morels and moistened with a splash of jus. It's a dish fit for a king. With it, the wine was a Curtis "Cross-roads Block" Syrah mouth-friendly, food-friendly, slightly sweet. Even my beerdedicated partner enjoyed a sip.

Before I could take two bites, my partner's entrée of farmraised Baja mano de león scallops arrived, mingling with Maine lobster meat, bacon, and succotash. Baja scallops don't taste the same as Gloucester scallops: they're full of flavor but a tad tougher and saltier than their Atlantic cousins. They're also

more consistent, and usually fresher (which is why local star chefs like George's at the Cove's Trey Foshee and Asia Vous's Riko Bartolomei have been favoring them). They were beautifully seared, translucent at the center, and garnished with thick slices of applewoodsmoked slab bacon from Neuske's Smokery in Wisconsin, hunks of genuine lobster (not cheap processed knuckle meat but the flesh of whole "culls," blanched and shelled inhouse), and a succotash of fresh corn and baby fava beans moistened by the salty cooking juices. (The other nine entrée choices include roasted Shelton Farms free-range chicken, Kurabata pork short rib and loin, panroasted sea bass, and California lamb porterhouse.)

I saved a bit of Syrah wine for the last course, a choice of one cheese or a selection of fruit with crème fraîche. I chose a goat cheese, served with dates, walnuts, and walnut bread. It arrived fridge-cold, so I took most of it home for a midnight snack. Trying it later at room temperature, I found it mellow on the exterior but grainy at the center, needing further aging. (This works for American tastes but would be frowned on in France, where cheeses are served mature and warm, running all over the plate like melting ice cream.)

My partner leaped at the chance to try a white peach tarte Tatin, devised by Del pastry chef Daphne Higa and plated by

1500's Pam Averkamp. This proved a charming rendition, with a single paper-thin pastry layer as the foundation for a fruity, not-too-sweet edifice of peach slices — natural, unspiced, some pieces unpeeled. With it came a "peach soup," a thick, intense nectar seasoned with allspice and clove. On a cooler night, we might have chosen the Medjool date and almond tart with blue cheese mousse, or the warm mango rice pudding. A few degrees hotter out, and the fruit sorbet vacherin would have tempted us

With its new view, chef, and menu, 1500 is a restaurant I'd revisit anytime, and one where I'd be happy to invite my outof-town guests. The Del may be one of our most stately monuments, but there's life in the old

ABOUT THE CHEF

"My mother cooks, and her mom, Grandmother Myers, cooked a lot," says Jason Shaeffer, raised in a tight-knit family in North Carolina. "I remember helping out as a little kid. I don't want to say it was a farm, but we raised chickens for eggs, and we had a huge garden, so I was always weeding and helping out there. I remember going down in spring with old-school serrated steak knives and cutting asparagus for that night's dinner. I started working as a dishwasher in the summer when I was 15, to get money for a car when I turned 16. I was bussing tables, too. It was a seasonal place, and at the end of the season all the cooks were leaving, and they asked me if I wanted to learn how to cook. I had done some pizza-making, sandwich-making, that kind of stuff, so I learned how to cook there and fell in love with it. I've been with it ever since. I learned on the job for about a year and a half, and then I went to culinary school at Johnson and Wales in Rhode Island.

"I came to San Diego for a job that fell through. I was at Laurel for three years, and I moved from there to New York for two years, working as souschef under Thomas Keller [of the French Laundry] at Per Se and under Terrence Brennan at Artisinal Cheese Center. It was a great experience.... But I decided I wanted to come back to San Diego so I moved back here about a year ago, worked odd jobs, and then this job came up. I started here in February and was in on the whole project.

"At Per Se I learned a lot of things about discipline, about the way to do things, that I brought here. We have respect for each other and the food, and I learned techniques and technology. We train our staff here the same way. We had seminars and training sessions six, seven days of the week before we opened, to get as much knowledge out there as we possibly could. And instead of just calling in an order, I went out to the farms, shook hands, spent some time in the dirt. Met people in

the seafood industry in Santa Barbara. Met the cheesemakers we use, watched them make their cheese. And I put people in touch, like, the Bubalus Bubalis cheesemakers were looking for a distributor, and I helped them find one, so you may find that cheese at other local restaurants in the future.

"The philosophy of Southern California cuisine, which we're outlining as Santa Barbara down to Cabo San Lucas, is in terms of what is available here as our base of a true regional cooking style with a kind of whimsical approach — using things that are produced locally, things that are fresh and seasonal (although it's hard to say 'seasonal' here because the seasons go on and on). This concept was in place when I got here. They hired Clark Wolf, an entertainment consultant from Clark Wolf Company, for this whole project. He came up with the concept and hired the Engstrom Group from the San Francisco Bay Area. They did the design of the restaurant so this is a Clark Wolf brainchild. He works out of New York, but he's originally from the L.A. area, and he's done some pretty big stuff.

"I'm gonna change the menu every two and a half to three months, to follow the produce that's in season. At the end of each season we're going to preserve and pickle and jar the ingredients so we can keep them a little longer than that season." ■

eet you at Luigi's, Mission Beach," Hank hollered into his new Razr cell phone before the damned thing cut out on him. Never did catch the time. But it'll be lunch. I know the guy's circadian rhythms to the minute.

Trouble is, I'm already here. Way early. Way hungry.

Uh, yes, I'm back in Mission Beach. Something about that crazy roller coaster calls to me. The way it swoops up and down, in and out, clanking like an anchor chain. Bet that sound hasn't

changed in 80 years. People probably stood here listening to it when Hoover was president, when Lindbergh was still trying out that no-window plane of his, when the first nuke went up in Nevada...

Plus, I love Mission Beach. Those little alleys and walking-only lanes with their beach cottages on either side — Who wouldn't want to live here? The quiet. It's an experience to stop and listen.

So this mawnin' I head back from the payphone down near the sand, through one of the lanes, Island Court, to check out where Luigi's is. I pass a building with a giant bougainvillea pouring over its hooped green canopies in purple waves. Jungle's returning. Man, how Carla would love it. I come out onto Mission Boulevard. Zoom zoom! We're back in the 21st Century.

Beach. Not the bikinis, burgers, 'n booze crowd around the corner on Ventura Place. Here, it's places like the Get It On Smoke Shop, or another joint advertising "Best Deals, \$5.99 or Less." Old guys in black leather Harley jackets yap at each

other as they gun their motors. Ah. I spot Luigi's to the right. Big red, yellow, black, and white building. Blue Bud Light umbrellas outside.

But somehow, I can't face the idea of pasta, pizza, or spaghetti at this early hour. I have an idea. Across the road, next to a bike-

mocha-chai-smoothie stuff, but they've also got a page's listing of food. Breakfast things like Denver omelet (three eggs with ham, cheese, onions, green pepper, potatoes, pancakes, or toast) for \$5.99, and bacon and eggs (three eggs, with potatoes), \$6.50. Most of the items are Mexican-flavored, like the huevos con chorizo (\$6.50) or the carne asada plate with rice, beans, and tortillas (\$6.75).

But what's this? "Two Breakfast Tacos — 3 eggs, bacon, cheese, corn tortillas, \$6.50." I mean, who ever heard of "breakfast tacos"? Then I remember the breakout tacos of La Ermita down in Tijuana. Shrimp, pineapple, and raspberry sauce in a taco? Who knew? The world isn't just confusing, it's fusing! Tacos, burritos, pancakes, crêpes, wraps — everything's being wrapped up. Natch, I ask for it.

I get a coffee too, \$1.50 with refills, and follow the girl taking my coffee out to...oh...what a great little patio. Nice and cool. Green umbrellas, black metal-mesh tables and chairs among ferns, young palms, climbing jasmine, even a row of marigolds — and a little fountain chuckling away, with water splotting down three levels to waiting sea lions. A couple of way-big Spanish lanterns, black metal with orange glass slits, complete the picture. In the distance, you can make out the top of the roller coaster tracks. And just over the marigolds, I can see the goingson across the road at Luigi's. I'll be able to holler for Hank.

The guy brings out my breakfast. And, yes, it's a new idea, for sure. Two hot corn tortillas with scrambled eggs and a strip of bacon across each. Good-looking, but it needs something like Frank's sauce to give it heat. They have Tabasco and Tapatía. I splot Tapatía, then take a bite. Hmm. It's filling, but somehow not that electrifying. Have I been spoiled for unusual tacos by La Ermita?

"Isn't this exciting?" says a big guy at the next table. "I flew in from Chicago this morning. Found this place not far from my vacation rental. I feel like I'm in old Mexico.

Maybe we border folk are getting too blasé. Guess this patio could be a hacienda in, say...Puebla. Bet those lanterns are sexy as hell

Plus, his and his friend's plates do look exciting. He's got huevos a la Mexicana, eggs mixed with tomatoes, onion, bell pepper, and potatoes (\$6.50), and his girlfriend's chowing into a grilled chicken plate, chicken breast with tomatoes, lettuce, onion, and black olives.

Sigh. Next time. Or maybe I can sell Hank on getting one of them when I haul him across the road.

That reminds me. Better keep a weather-eye out over the marigolds. ■

Full Stomach, Empty Wallet

"I call it Chuck E. Cheese for adults. I have to squeeze myself sometimes, business is so good."

he word I heard was that Ed Moore was headed toward semiretirement. Last September, he sat down, assessed his plans for the coming year, and realized he was beginning to lose interest in Thee Bungalow, the Ocean

Beach institution that Moore made famous for, among other things, its remarkable wine list. (Even now, after selling the place, he still goes back and cherry-picks some of those finds whose prices haven't risen with the tide. "Most customers there were content in the \$30-\$40 range," he says, "but

if I find something that I think is a screamer at \$60, I'll buy it without thinking twice.")

He still had his wine club, which passed along to its members some of the deals he managed to sniff out. But the 3rd Corner — his big Mediterranean-feel project across the street — hadn't worked out. "The decision to close was a business decision. At some point you have to get above everything, look at the landscape, and say, 'Whatever we're doing, we're not doing it right. It ain't working.'

To make the mortgage payments, he started renting the building out for catered parties. Two a month would pay the rent, and Moore made money off the bar (he kept the liquor license).

Then he started moving Thee Bungalow's wine dinners into the place. "That worked out just fine. I was doing 100 dinners with the wine thing and still doing 70, 80 dinners at Thee Bungalow.'

The success of the wine club, however, had

led him to consider converting the space to a retail wine shop. Oh, and while he was at it, why not serve a little food? "I made the menu very simple. I had the food expertise to set up something that was somewhat limited," and fairly foolproof. "I didn't want to sauté a lot of things on top of the stove;

I didn't want things that were too critical." Things like duck confit, baked chicken, short ribs, mushroom pasta. A few cheeses, some salads and desserts. Smaller portions, nothing over \$14.

And then the kicker: Why not let customers buy bottles off the racks and drink them onsite for just \$5 more? "You read Wine Spectator, any of those magazines, and there's always a letter to the editor — somebody's pissed about restaurant markups. Most wine lists today don't start until \$30. Some of them don't start until \$40 or \$50. It drives you nuts. You look at that list, and you see stuff you recognize at a three, three-anda-half markup. Why? We want to make friends. We want to bring people back."

He envisioned 60-70 percent of the business coming from the retail end, with the restaurant padding things out — just a few tables here and there, plus the patio and the bar. He borrowed \$50,000 to stock the shop and added "Wine Shop" to the existing 3rd Corner sign.

Things didn't work out quite as planned. Looking back, says Moore, "I had a funny inkling about what was going to happen." Before Thee Bungalow sold, "We did a chef's celebration dinner over here — Thee Bungalow wasn't really big enough. I had done a couple of wine sales to the wine club here, and they had been very successful. We had racks in, and we had floor stacks of wine,

and I just didn't want to move everything out of here. So I said, 'Let's see how many tables we can get in here; just kind of put them around the wine.' I think we did 90 dinners or so, and everybody loved this environment of being in the middle of the wines. Everybody who walked in here thought the place looked great. It was simple: just throw a ton of wine out there. Everybody likes the look of wine."

Moore learned a lesson about the retail business, which has been slower than he expected. "A lot of it is convenience — where you're located, where your market is coming from." He learned another about the restaurant business, which has exceeded his wildest expectations. "The concept seems to work. It's not the normal restaurant.' By this, he means the kind that leaves you with a full stomach but an empty wallet and an anxious heart, "The uniform statement, the one I hear over and over again, is, 'It's amazing how much fun we had.' I call it Chuck E. Cheese for adults.



I have to squeeze myself sometimes, business is so good." He paid off the \$50,000 in two months.

The new 3rd Corner worked "right off the bat — and that's the absolute rarity. Without any ads or anything. The only thing we had was a big inflatable gorilla up on the roof. I put that up there so that people would look at the building -'What is that place? Oh, that's a wine shop and

The gorilla grabbed attention; the rest was a matter of right time, right place, right concept: "I think the market in OB is much more upscale than it's given credit for. It's price-conscious, but it's savvy. It's cultured." As with the rest of San Diego, the demographics are shifting: "Now, we have a lot of food-service people, people in the service industry. Younger couples who probably don't want kids; at least, not right away. Then you start looking up the hill — people who bought houses for \$500K, then dumped \$300K more into remodeling. They come down here.'

The crowd changes as the evening progresses: at five o'clock, the median age skews toward 70; at 2 a.m., it's closer to 22. But thanks to the pricing, even the more moneyed oldtimers get to play outside their usual safety zone. "If they're used to spending \$40, \$50 on a wine list, and they see all the things we've got for \$15-\$20," they're more likely to look at an unfamiliar varietal and declare, 'Yeah, let's try that.' Someone once told me, 'If it's bad, I only spent \$8 — I'll take it home and cook with it.' They'll sit down -'A bottle of Sonoma-Cutrer for \$16.50 plus a \$5 corkage? That's a deal! Let's have a second one! And what about one of those?' By that point, they've got the glow. 'Now, let's get a few of these to take home. He's got some great prices here.'

So much for semiretirement. "It's been a really interesting movement," says Moore. "I could see having two or three of these in the San Diego market. Maybe two or three in L.A./Orange County. I'm dying to open up another one." ■

Bubby's Gelato 937 South Coast Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Center, Encinitas, 760-436-3563. This tiny storefront does only a few things (sandwiches, gelati, and sorbet), but does them exceedingly well. The "gourmet sandwiches" really do live up to their designation, with intriguing Mediterranean combinations (artichoke hearts black olives, grilled eggplant, gorgonzola are among the choice of ingredients) on soft, round Italian bread. (Or you can just get a tuna melt if that's your flavor.) Ashoka the Great 9474 Black Mountain Road (off Miramar Road), Mira Mesa, 858-695-9749. Seek out this splendid Indian restaurant. The setting is lovely, the service excellent, and the food first-rate. Don't overlook the tan-doori dishes. Numerous selections are available for vegetarians. An all-you-can-eat lunch buffet is served daily. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

Athens Market Cafe 11640 Carmel Theatres, Carmel Mountain Plaza,

858-675-2225. At this offshoot of Mary Pappas's downtown Athens Market, sister Vickie's food is just as good. If you want a big start, order the saganaki, a cheese appetizer that comes flaming to your table. And you can't lose with mezedakia, a big oval sampler of dol-mades (stuffed grape leaves), lokaniko (a delicious Greek sausage), spanako-pita (spinach in filo pastry), tomatoes, cucumbers, *tzatziki* dip, hummus, feta cheese, and olives. But come for the lamb. It's wonderfully flavorful, skewered in the souvlaki entrée (which comes with beans and rice) or as lamb chops. Moussaka (baked eggplant, zuc chini, and ground beef) goes down well too. Or what's wrong with a simple plate of feta cheese, kalamata olives, and a glass of Greek red? Open daily, 11 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (1/06)

Bamboo Hut Black Mountain Village, 9172 Mira Mesa Boulevard (one driveway west of Black Mountain Road), Mira Mesa, 858-348-0414. You'll find a taste of Hawaii in a strip mall in a neighborhood that's all-mall. The bright little "hut" has bamboo chairs, a bamboo ceiling, bare floors, and unclothed tables, with a sushi counter next to a tiny kitchen with a roaring gas grill. A large lattice awning offers outdoor seating a few steps from the door. The quality of the food is all over the map, though — this is not the place to try your first Spam sushi. The seafood sushi is good, though, including a fine Rainbow Roll with really sweet crab; the more creative rolls run to cream cheese and hot sauce. "Local food" choices include a tasty ahi poké and excellent chicken katsu; the kalbi short ribs are tough, though. Plate lunches include one to three entrées (priced accordingly) with steamed or mildly garlic-flavored rice, macaroni

salad, and green salad with bright or-ange dressing à la Kraft French. Be sure they deliver what you ordered; there may be slipups. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Very inexpensive. N.W. (8/03)

Bistro 221 221 East Grand Avenue (near Kalmia), Escondido, 760-737-7398. This genteel bistro — with comfortable chairs and linen-covered tables inside and a shaded patio on the sidewalk — is especially tasty at lunch, with its sophisticated quesadillas and a classic burger and fries cooked vour way. At dinner simple starters shine, including a "blonde" Florida ver sion of gumbo and Maryland crab cakes with minimal filler. The dinner entrées are also the best, including beef tournedos with Gorgonzola grouper caught just off the Florida shores. A "Louisiana" bread pudding is moister (hence more pleasing) than most of its namesakes. No wheelchair access for restrooms. Free parking behind restaurant. Ordinary wine list. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Friday; dinner Saturday. Lunch moderate; dinner moderate to high. — N.W. (10/04)

La Tapatia 340 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-747-8282. Take a walk on the mild side at this family-owned favorite, in business since the 1930s. You'll find standard Mexican fare in a comfortable dining room or, in good weather, a lovely, arbor-like stonewalled patio. The most celebrated dish is the "cheese crisp," a large tostada covered one-third in ground beef, one-third in beef chunks, and one-third in beans, with cheese, avocado puree, and sour cream over all. Many preparations (grilled seafoods, etc.) are healthy, and veggies taste fresh. Seasonings are rather detuned, but there's a saltshaker and a lively salsa on the table. Open

daily, three meals. Moderate. — N.W. (5/01)

The Place: El Parque 2659 Reche Road, Fallbrook, 760-731-2775. Just think Little Red Riding Hood — this is Grandma's place. Okay, it's not a little old, thatched cottage — it's a cream-painted metal shed with a gazebo in front. But it is in the Live Oak woods, and you can sink your teeth into some pretty fair Mexican food here, sitting alongside an interesting bunch of agri cultural workers and maybe some ruby miners. Good combination plates in clude the tostada and beef taco, and burrito and enchilada. The time to be here is Sunday morning, when those aggies pour in here for the *menudo*, cooked in a three-foot-high pot. Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/04)

The Wayside Cafe 507 South Main Avenue, Fallbrook, 760-723-9633. Locals love meeting and eating in this long low-porched building — partly because it all just feels small-town America. The place used to be Mahrs' Service Station. You can even sit in the old Lube Bay to eat. Count on generous servings, especially the mountain-piles of red-skinned home-fries as a side at breakfast. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

LA JOLLA

Barbarella 2171 Avenida de la Playa, La Jolla Shores, 858-454-7373. This popular restaurant sits nestled in an English garden just blocks from the beach. You can dine amidst the flora at street-side tables, in the enclosed patio, or in the small dining room. Once you're seated, the friendly staff provides fresh-out-of-the-oven sourdough wheat bread to nibble on. The menu changes daily, offering fresh fish, steak, chicken, pastas, soups, and pizzas, all cooked with a twist of imagination that delivers on the flavor. For instance: pizza topped with smoked salmon, crème frîche, chives, and fried capers. Or delicate Alaskan halibut served over creamed spring onions with a water-cress salad. If a fresh fruit crêpe happens to be on the dessert menu, leap on it! Open for lunch and dinner daily. — S.M. (4/04)

Beach House Brewery 7536 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-6279. Don't expect to see the beach. Do expect to taste some good beers made right here and good solid food, such as the prime rib sandwich (which goes great with their Irish Stout) or the roasted potato. Or maybe best of all, the buffalo burger — big, hefty, and low on cholesterol. You'd call this a family, multigenerational sports bar eatery. Nice mix. It's La Jolla, so it's not dirt cheap but the guys here seem really interested in making interesting brews and good food to accompany them. Open for dinner seven days; lunch and dinner weekends. Inexpensive to moderate. E.B. (1/04)

Daily's Restaurant 8915 Towne Centre Drive, La Jolla, 858-453-1112. The idea is brilliant: Just serve food that's really, really good for your customers. Low fat, low calorie, low sodium. Brainchild of cardiac surgeon Pat O. Daily. So what s the problem? It's the "B" word. Bland. Not that they don t fight heroically to make all the dishes interesting, but lots of items have that lentil-y, bean-y feel. Or naked salad-y. Or steam-up-your nose veggie. Among the more interesting choices is the Cajun chicken with black beans and brown rice with cayenne-pa-prika in the spices. The most popular lunch order, the buffalo burger, has a little gamy aftertaste - but that just proves it is the legendarily lean prairie beast. Nice outside seating in Restaurant Row, except you've gotta resist the smells from the more wicked eateries that aren't on the same crusade. Inexpensive. Three meals, Monday through Friday; open until 4 p.m. Saturday; closed Sunday. — E.B. (1/06)

The Marine Room 2000 Spindrift Drive (off Torrey Pines Road), La Jolla, 858-459-7222. High cuisine, high adsos-499-/222. Fign cuisine, nign adventure, high seas — at only moderately high prices. With chef Bernard Guillas as top toque, the Marine Room has become the quintessential great San Diego restaurant. The ex-hilarating coastal view meets Cal-French-Pacific Rim cuisine that's


as exuberantly out-front as the waves whacking the windows. Guillas's oceanic culinary inventiveness with ultra-fresh, exotic ingredients makes every visit a voyage of discovery, and preparations are so elaborate that each listing on his precise menu reads like a whole tasting dinner. Reservations requested; slightly dressy but not stuffy. Easiest route: Make a right from westbound Torrey Pines onto Roseland or Viking and go left on St. Louis, which runs into Spindrift. Michele Coulon Pastries 7556-D Fay Avenue (across the street from Vons parking lot), La Jolla, 858-456-5098. The daughter of Don Coulon (retired chef/owner of The Belgian Lion restaurant) and her son preside in turn at this delightful little café/bakery. (Look for it behind the octagonal sandwich shop that fronts its mini-mall.) Every ingredient is fresh and of top quality. Cakes are light, moist, rich, and available as wholes, slices, and even "miniatures," plus you can choose tarts, chocolates, ice creams, and breakfast pastries. Open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday (closed Sunday). Moderate. N.W. (5/02)

Nine-Ten Restaurant Grande Colonial Hotel, 910 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-964-5400. Chef Jason Knibb's level of craftsmanship shows a culinary sophistication that would be at home in San Francisco or New York. You'll find adventurous, seasonal cuisine emphasizing "market fresh" local produce (much of it organic or sus-tainably raised), naturally raised meats, and wild seafood. It's not just the food that's fresh — the ideas are, too, and the flavor-matches are flawless. The wine list is superb, and new personnel in the front of the house have brought up the standard of service. Validated valet parking, full bar. Reservations urged. Open daily, three meals. Expensive. — N.W. (10/05)

Sushi on the Rock 7734 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-1138. This noisy, high-energy spot — a boxy, saloon-like space with a sushi bar in back — draws a lively twenty-some-thing crowd (although older folks will have plenty of company, too). Unlike more traditional sushi bars, there's a vast selection of "rock and rolls" — huge, creative party sushi. And they're fabulous, with sparkling fresh seafood and immensely clever combinations. Try, for instance, the shrimp tempura roll, which wraps fried shrimp, crab shreds, daikon sprouts and Japanese mayo in deep-fried salmon skin — the combo would be just as impressive as an appetizer at a top Cal-French restaurant. The Orange Crush is another sub-lime invention, fresh and crunchy with veggies and tobiko wrapped in suave salmon. Even simple rolls are so well conceived, and the rice so nicely seasoned, you won't need soy-wasabi dip. No reservations, long waits (in cramped entryway) on weekends. Full bar, good sake list. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly, with deep discounts for happy hour specials. Moderate, Second Barcelona, Carlsbad, 858-456-1138. —

Cucina Italiana Clairemont Square, 4705-A Clairemont Drive, Clairemont, 858-274-9732. Chef Jose Flores, who owned the much-missed Trattoria Nostrana in La Mesa, went back to his alma mater, Via Italia — and bought it. Under the new name, the menu is much the same as at Via Italia: multi-regional authentic Italian cuisine, including wonderful thin-crust pizzas, available only by the ten-inch pie, not by the slice. The restaurant is in a mall but doesn't serve mall-grub. The fresh pastas are made in-house and rolled thin, so raviolis have more filling than skin and the rich lasagna won't send you out waddling The numerous daily specials are the most rewarding dishes and keep dinners interesting for the many neighborhood regulars. Desserts and espresso are good: save room for millefoglie and torta della nonna when they're available. Plenty of wines by the glass. Reserve, especially for weekends and large parties. Heated patio dining in fair weather. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate (pastas and pizzas) to expensive (meat and seafood entrées). — N.W. (1/06)

Emerald Chinese Seafood Restaurant Pacific Gateway Plaza, 3709 Convoy Street (at Aero Drive), 1st floor, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888. Arguably the best Chinese restaurant in the county, here's where local Asians (of all nations) go for both casual family dinners and special feasts of Hong Kong specialties. When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Vietnamese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gourmet delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations accepted for all meals, including weekend dim sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in made-to-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate with moderate splurges like live fish and Peking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). Open daily from lunch until midnight or later. — N.W. (9/02)

King's Fish House 825 Camino de la Reina (west of Mission Center Drive), Mission Valley, 619-574-1230. To find King's in the megamall, go slightly west of Koo Koo Roo and follow the line of cars to the free valet parking. It's a chain, but it's a classy chain, offering fish and

seafoods of a quality that's well above average, including crustaceans from a live-tank and a half-dozen varieties of pristine oysters. Generously-sized entrées come with soup or salad (includ-ing a Caesar that's above suspicion) and two hefty side dishes. The yast menu of American-style preparations changes daily to reflect the fresh catch, and includes some rotating regional specialties (e.g., New Orleans, Hawaii, New England). Don't miss the prawn pot-sticker appetizer, if available, and for dessert, the miraculously light bread pudding. The atmosphere is good-timey (with two patios and a barroom as well as a dining room), the service is enthusiastic, and the management will accommodate special requests if you call ahead. Kiddie menu available. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate.

Korea House 4620 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-0080. Korea House offers floor seating or a table if you want to barbecue your own food. The menu offers fine "down-home" Korean food, such as traditional mandoo (beef) dumplings, gaejang backban, or raw crab, and yookhwe, a steak tartare worth risking. Make a meal from enormous appetizers like gul bosam (raw oysters, pork, and cabbage leaves). Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — M.N. (998)

Nijiya Market 3860 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-3821. If you're not willing to sacrifice quality for convenience when eating fast food, try this Japanese market in Kearny Mesa. Nijiya Market offers prepared box lunches, or bento, that are pretty to look at, appetizing, and a real bargain. I suggest, however, passing by Nijiya's steam trays and heat lamps and going straight to the coolers, where you'll find delicious chicken cutlets, fresh sushi, and chilled noodles, as well as dessert delicacies like sweet bread roll filled with sweet bean paste. Inexpensive. — M.N. (8/99)

Pampas Argentine Grill 8690 Aero Drive (at Montgomery Field), Kearny Mesa, 858-278-5971. The Argentine specialties feature grilled grass-fed beef, including a somewhat Americanized version of the gauchos' great parillada mixta (mixed grill), with a great chorizo but minus any exotic organs. The naturally raised meats are lower fat and lower cholesterol than feed-lot beef but are salted heavily in the kitchen unless you request otherwise. Specify rare or medium-rare, unless you really like brown cardboard. Lighter fare includes free-range chicken and fresh, well-treated seafood. Beef empanadas are a tasty, authentic starter. Potatoes (fries and mashed) are splendid, salads are ex-

uberant. The full bar features Chilean and Argentine beverages with many affordable South American wines by the glass. Park in lot at restaurant's front door, not the back-door lot. Lunch (mainly sandwiches) on weekdays. Dinner nightly. Entertaiment (harp) Friday through Sunday. Closed Monday. Moderate. — N.W. (4/02)

The Philadelphia Sandwich Co. 3904 Convoy Street (south of Othello), Kearny Mesa, 858-571-0888. This classic luncheonette is a monument to Philly culture, including sports pennants, historic photos, and colorful mummers' costumes. The menu is equally devoted to the city's cuisine, especially its two great cult sandwiches: the hoagie and the cheese steak. The mixed-meat hoagie is way more than a hero - its flavor array is similar to (and just as intense as) a New Orleans muffulletta. As for the cheese steak, it starts with steak strips, onions and your choice of cheese, and expands from there. Philly natives may like the simple version with Cheez Whiz, but the luscious "Everything" with provolone is more likely to seduce the innocent. "Philly fries" (with garlic) are the right go-with. The menu also offers Pennsylvaniapackaged foods ("Philadelphia Scrapple" to go, Tastykakes, Wise potato chips) to nostalgic émigrés. Lunch to early dinner nightly. Inexpensive. — N.W. (10/04)

San Tong Palace 4690 Convoy Street (between Engineer and Balboa), Kearny Mesa, 858-571-6837. This unassuming, strip-mall restaurant is easy to overlook, but once found, impossible to resist. San Tong's hybrid Korean-Chinese menu draws from these regions' tastiest styles. The Rainbow Salad demonstrates this combination deliciously, and San Tong's dumplings are outstanding. The seafood dumplings are especially remarkable. For the adventurous, I recommend the jellyfish salad, a novel treat for westerners. At San Tong Palace, curious appetites are rewarded well. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (4/99)

Seau's Mission Valley Center mall, 1640 Camino del Rio North (next to Robinsons-May), Mission Valley, 619-291-7328. Footballer Junior Seau contributes more to San Diego than just sacks. His extravagant multivenue sports pub is major league fun — a real-life reincarnation of some 1960s McLuhan-ite media art show, with 70 video screens (ranging from large-normal to giant HDTV) running sportscasts and a professional DJ on high, periodically spinning cool sounds over muted talking heads. The menu offers mainstream "something for everyone" choices, including pizza, hefty but so-so burgers, some elementary sushi, all-American entrées, and Seau's family recipe of Samoan teriyaki "plate lunch." Above all, there's pub grub. The chicken wings are pretty good, and you can get all three sauces (Buffalo, BBO, and Asian) on one order. Perfect hangout for mismatched couples with one sports fan and one fashionista (the latter can head for Nordstrom and Saks discount outlets nearby). On game days, patrons are allowed just one game in the dining room (\$15 minimum), but you can linger from wake-up to closing on the patio or in the bar. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (1/03)

Tofu House 4646 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-576-6433. This stylish little eatery is proof positive that our city has matured for its specialty ethnic foods. Tofu House is a Korean restaurant serving up specialty tofu dishes. Flavorful, healthy foods. I highly recommend the *soontofu* soups (beef, pork, seafood, or mushroom) with raw egg drop you drop yourself and a side of tasty fresh kimchee. Deliver yourself from sorrowfully generic foreign food — Tofu House serves vivid ethnic food. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *M.N.* (2/99)

THE BEACHES

Cafe Athena Pacific Mall, 1846 Garnet Avenue (at Lamont), Pacific Beach, 858-274-1140. With a more upscale, eye-catching decor and a longer and more serious menu than most Greek cafés, this is a popular destination, so be sure to reserve for dinner or you'll risk a long wait. The choices include good soups and appetizers (except for a sub-par taramasalata), outstanding





Cantina Panaderia 966 Felspar Street (at Cass), Pacific Beach, 858-272-8400. This cheerful café instantly became a gathering spot for many PB-ites, including the forsaken population of adults. Chef-owner Isabel Cruz, who calls herself "Food Girl," has imported much of her Mission Cafe nu of Latin-Asian-sorta-health-food to the beach. A self-confessed "lazy cook," she focuses on wholesomeness rather than authenticity. Breakfast and lunch are the main meals here and include competent eggs, luscious scrambled eggs, huge sandwiches, and weighty slabs of coconut French toast. Competent Latin-style dishes include tamales with airy masa. Devotees of Southeast Asian cuisines, however, may be disappointed by the simplistic stabs in that direction. If your dish is too mild, house sauces (chili oil, salsa, chipotle sauce, etc.) are available on request. Beer and wine. Small, free front parking lot; pay lot across the street at west end of the block. Three meals daily; closed 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Inexpensive to low moderate.

Costa Brava 1653 Garnet Avenue (at Jewel), Pacific Beach, 858-273-1218. Cordial owner-host Javier Gonzalez opened this charming restaurant so that local Spaniards would have a place to gather with an authentic atmosphere of home, and indeed, the "Euro" atmosphere and late hours give a truly Iberian feel. The lively garlic-rich dishes here include a wide array of tasty tapas and, among the entrées, a paella that's made

to order (sized to serve two or four; call ahead for larger groups). Patio seating in good weather. Parking lot and wheelchair access via the alley behind the restaurant. Open daily 11 a.m. to midnight, with bargain prices at Sunday brunch. Reservations advised for weekend evenings. Moderate. — N.W. (2/02)

The Fishery 5040 Cass Street, Pacific Beach, 858-272-9985, Pacific Shellfish Seafood Company founder Judd Brown got his start as a commercial fisherman. He doesn't fish anymore, but he does everything else — supplying product to top-tier restaurants, retailing glistening specimens to hungry shoppers and serving patrons who want to dine in amid the icy-blue walls and gorgeous trophy fish. The Fishery's menu is equally ex tensive, covering SoCal basics (excellent mahi-mahi burrito), lunchtime standards (sandwiches, fine malt-dredged fish and chips), sushi, and an ambitious lineup of dinnertime entrées, some of them whimsically creative (tortilla-en-crusted Mexican black bass). If ambition occasionally outstrips execution, an obsession with freshness helps compensate, and you get the sense that things are getting better all the time. The wine list is relatively inexpensive and carefully selected. Casual atmosphere. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — A.M. (12/03)

Humphrey's by the Bay 2241 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-224-3577. Most diners at this resort/concert venue restaurant eat at the prix-fixe pre-show dinners because they guarantee good seats for the concerts at the next-door ampitheatre. But better food emerges once the music-mavens leave the premises. The kitchen features fine seafood, juicy meats, and prime steaks with seasonal veggie garnishes. Preparations are pleasing but in no way startling — it's a hotel restaurant, after all. Reserve for show-nights or to snare a window table with a gorgeous marina view. Free parking when there's no concert, valet parking when there is. Dining

room pleasantly quiet. Open daily breakfast through dinner; brunch buffet Sunday. Pre-show prix fixe upper moderate, à la carte expensive/very expensive. — N.W. (2/06)

Kabuki Sushi Restaurant 4475 Mission Boulevard (entrance on Garnet), Pacific Beach, 858-270-1986. This place has a unique system of delivering tempting dishes to you via boats floating along a mini-canal that surrounds the sushi bar. You take food off and pay according to the plate size. The sushi chefs — they can be a show in themselves - have the usual panoply of sushi, sashimi, nigiri. The dragon rolls (crab, shrimp tempura, eel, avocado) and spider roll (soft-shelled crab) are tasty too. It's young and crowded — is that because you don't have to sweat the menu, just grab what you like off the boat and chew? Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday to Saturday: dinner only Sunday; closed Monday. In expensive to moderate. — E.B. (1/04)

Kaiserhof 2253 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-224-0606. Even on weeknights, crowds fill this restaurant and biergarten, chowing down on hefty, hearty German cooking in a festive atmosphere. Flavors are authentic, but can be monotonous due to kitchen s reliance on commercial products (especially a heavy-flavored beef base that makes all the sauces taste alike). Good schnitzels, potato pancakes. The excellent apple strudel is the only dessert made in-house. Reservations advised, especially for patio seating. Full bar. Lunch Friday through Sunday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday, Moderate. — N.W. (6/02)

Red Sails 2614 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-223-3030. One of the city's oldest eateries has been renovated to look like it always has, but fresher. The dining rooms resemble those on a river paddleboat or a small, rakish cruise ship, while the bayside patio is a funky waterside pleasure, beset by pigeons. The menu runs to simple seafood and steaks (wet-aged USDA Choice), but

quality is uneven. Tasty starters include briny littleneck clams on the half-shell, an interesting clam chowder, and a classy house salad (but ask for vinegar and oil on the side to dress it). The coconut shrimp entrée is a good, guilty pleasure, but the fin-fish and fried entrées taste like supermarket frozen food. For the starch accompaniment, baked potato is the most flavorful option. Full bar, strong cocktails, weak wine list. Kiddie menu available. Daily three meals until 11 p.m. Low moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

El Comal 2822 Imperial Avenue, Grant Hill, 619-239-7101. (Other location at 534 Broadway, Chula Vista 619-420-3811.) No border compromises here — just great home-cooking from Michoacan, Guerrero, Jalisco, and Oaxaca, prepared by Luz Herrera Ibarra, a biology teacher from Acapulco. Try the huarache (cactus slices with carne asada, frijoles, cheese, and onions) or the mulita carne adobada (pork, melted cheese, and guacamole inside two tortillas) and have a glass of nuez (a refreshing walnut drink). Breakfast through dinner, closing at 9 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Lefty's Chicago Pizzeria 3448 30th Street (at Myrtle), North Park, 619-295-1720. An eight-pound pizza? That's what Lefty claims his "king of all pizzas" weighs at his often-crowded little corner pizzeria. Truth is, you can't help but be drawn, especially at night, to the little ribbon of lights framing the sidewalk canopy with its tables and benches. Lefty is determined to bring "the real Chicago" to San Diego. So of course we're talking deep-dish pizzas, as well as some thin and crispy. But the ultimate is his "stuffed" pizza, a 14-inch, eight-pound monster that

needs one hour's "make and bake" time. They also do Chicago hot dogs, char burgers, beautiful spicy fries, juicy Italian beef au jus sandwiches, and a decent "Lefty's carbonara" (spaghetti, eggs, bacon, Parmesan, and cream). Open lunch and dinner six days, closed Mondays. — E.B. (5/05)

Old World Restaurant 3930 30th Street, North Park, 619-238-0568. This is a delight for anyone who loves Northern European food. Their "Great Grilled Grueben" — homemade corned beef on rye with Swiss cheese, sauerkraut, Thousand Island dressing, and mustard is, as they say, "gemütlich." Also, try the sausage platter: grilled bratwurst, kielbasa, sauerkraut, potato salad, spicy mustard, and rye bread. Open for breakfast and lunch weekdays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

Sister Pee Wee's Soul Food 2971-1/2 Imperial Avenue, Grant Hill, 619-236-0470. One of the oldest, best soul food cafés in the county, but get there early (it closes at 8 p.m.). Sister Pee Wee says her daily lunch and dinner menu depends on what she feels like cooking that day — you might find big pork ribs with mashed red-skin potatoes, black-eyed peas, collard greens and two-inch-thick corn bread, or Southern-fried chicken, or catfish fillet with all the trimmings. Sister's special is chitlins and catfish. (Call ahead about the availability of chitlins.) Breakfast includes eggs, bacon, ham, sausages, and hominy grits. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

Tazablanca 3946 Illinois (north of University, two blocks east of 30th Street), North Park, 619-294-8292. This warm-colored, lively cafe offers the homey, tropical food of Cuba and some pan-Latin appetizers cooked with Cuban styling. The fried calamari is light, the *papa rellena* (stuffed potato) is lively, the *lechón* (marinated roast pork) is moist and flavorful, and the vibrant chicken fricassee with capers is irresistible. All entrées come with a

salad, and the tequila-lime dressing is especially fresh tasting. Reservations for groups of six or more. Park behind the restaurant (via Grimm and the alley) or in Lumberjacks's lot. Live band plays Thursday through Sunday evenings and is quieter than the ambient music when there's no band. Patio seating in fair weather. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Full bar including mojitos, Mexican beers, mainstream wines, and Latin soft drinks. Moderate. — N.W. (1/06)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Ana Maria's 8680 Navajo Road (northwest corner at Lake Murray Boulevard), San Carlos, 619-337-3674. In this homey little restaurant, the food is regional Peruvian, specializing in the coastal area from Callao on north, plus some recently adopted Caribbean influences from Colombia. Highlights include the elaborate "Ana Maria's Ceviche," an array of citrus-marinated seafood with sweet potatoes and cancha, smoked hominy corn kernels. The an-ticuchos (heart kebabs) boast a zesty marinade, and the lomo saltado (sautéed beef loin strips with tomatoes, peppers, and French fries cooked right in with the liquid) is an outstanding version it's made with tender steak, not the typical chewy carne asada meat. Beer and wine. Early dinner Tuesday through Thursday; lunch and dinner Friday and Saturday: dinner Sunday afternoon to early evening. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *N.W.* (10/04)

Greek Town 345 West Main Street, El Cajon, 619-441-9708. Just another Greek buffet? Well, yes. Your choices are standard: gyros meat, *spanakopita*, moussaka, *dolmades*. And the décor is the usual blue and white with Greek island posters. But it's the customers who give it an exotic feel, speaking languages from Russian to Greek to Somali. And











if you're hungry, this all-you-can-eat deal is great. Have gyros meat, but also try the chicken souvlaki (grilled lemon chicken), or start with the excellent dolmades (grape leaves wrapped around beef and rice). The leaves' tangy taste and the lemony sauce inside get your juices running. Don't forget salad... or the dessert table (how could you leave without baklava?). Open for lunch and dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. -

Mario's de la Mesa 8425 La Mesa Boulevard (at Grant), La Mesa, 619-461-9390. The man on the *burro* (seen on the restaurant's sign and menu) holds two flags, those of Mexico and the U.S.A. — very appropriate. Few dishes (except maybe the menudo) will push the paler palate too far in any direction, but gosh-all, everything is so darn tasty. Tamales are a house special: rich, pillowy clouds of cornmeal surrounding richer shredded pork scattered with raisins for a smidgeon of sweetness. Pork also gets loving treatment in the carnitas rojas, big chunks browned to the barest crisp, which falls away to melting tenderness. Great marinade (cumin?) on the *carne asada*; intense flavor and buttery richness on the "machaca style" (dry-roasted shredded beef). Beans are so light as to seem whipped; rice is studded with peas and spicy carrots. Service is fast and friendly. Breakfast and lunch Sunday and Monday; three meals Tuesday through Saturday. Inexpensive. — A.M. (7/01)

Ranas.Com 9683 Campo Road, Suite A, Spring Valley, 619-589-1792. With 33 Mexican restaurants in the area, this Mexico City eatery has got to be good It's a cheery place with lime green walls and orange accents. Cooking from the

capital tends to be less bitingly hot than some northern food, with unexpected taste combos, like *pollo en salsa de cac-ahuate* (an almost Thai-tasting chicken in peanut sauce which comes with rice. beans, and tortilla). Or try the delicious pelangoches, a mess of bacon, pork, pineapple, mushrooms, bell peppers, onions, and cheese. Aztec *huarache* (cactus with potato, cheese, lettuce, sour cream, and salsa) is also easy to love. Open Monday through Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/04)

Woodstock's Pizza 6145 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-265-0999. It's a college pizza joint, but the fare rates well above standard beer ballast. For that weil above standard beer ballast. For that matter, the beers — Karl Strauss and Wyder's Ciders (along with the usual Coors Light and Bud) — aren't exactly chug-suds. Crusts — white or sweetly robust whole wheat — are pressed, tossed, and then folded over at the edge, producing a spongy, crunch-crusted rim. The mozzarella is rich, gooey whole-milk; the marinara sauce is dark and spicy; and the toppings are fresh, hearty standouts. Watching your weight? Two low-fat combos (half the cheese) are available. Happy hour with cut-price beer, etc., 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. to midnight. Inexpensive. -A.M. (4/02)

FAR EAST

The Hideout Steakhouse and Saloon 27413 Highway 76, Santa Ys abel, 760-782-3656. If you're a Harley Davidson weekend warrior, this is for you: an old dark timbered roadhouse peeking out of the trees, with its own

spring-fed water wheel, 3000 feet up the mountains. Back in the thirties, Hollywood celebs (Roy Rogers, Alfalfa, et al.) used to hang out here on huntin and fishin' trips. Now, bike enthusiasts make it their weekend day-trip destination. It still has a 1920s fireplace roaring at one end, a big pot-belly stove at the other, a honky-tonk upright piano, and a forty-foot-long oakwood bar. Cheeseburgers are the default dish. Available are a "Texas-sized baked potato," vegetables, salad, and squaw bread. Open Saturday and Sunday only. Inexpensive to moderate. - *E.B.* (5/02)

Owl Cafe 674 Main Street (between 6th and 7th), El Centro, 760-336-0298 This classic American café is over 50 years old and still serves good rib-sticking food morning, noon, or night. Try breakfast special #1: pancakes, two eggs, and two bacon strips. For lunch, the French dip sandwich. Full-plate dinners — and they are full — include roast beef and chicken-fried steak. Open Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. (bar until 2 a.m.); Saturday, bar only. Closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

Alex's Brown Bag 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel), Suite 171, uptown, 619-231-2912. The reborn Alex's (now in the Mr. A's building) is rightly famous for its "Original Philadelphia cheese steak sandwich" (with fried bell peppers, onions, mushrooms, and mozzarella). The owners say what makes their sandwiches so special is that they have the meat trucked in from cheese steak central, South Philly itself. Other Italian-American goodies include the Italian Stallion (Genoa salami, capocolla prosciutto, and mortadella sausage meat), egg plant parmigiana with hot garlic bread, grilled pastrami, and cheese on rye. Open for breakfast, lunch, and just-after-work dinner weekdays. — E.B. (9/01)

Busalacchi's Ristorante 3683 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania), uptown, 619-298-0119. Remember Olympia Dukakis in Moonstruck retreating for comfort to her local trattoria? Busalacchi's has that settled. warm feel, but it's more interesting. Multi-levels create nooks and crannies for *liaisons dangereuses*, or there's the streetside casual level. Niche fountains and faux marble columns make it feel old-fashioned. Being Sicilian, they have plenty of the tomato-sauce-dominated dishes (like torta di melanzana eggplant layered with mozzarella). But also try the excellent calamari piccata, a calamari "steak" bathed in butter, mushrooms, lemon, capers, and white wine. Simple but delish. Or salads like insalata di fileto with filet mignon, goat cheese, walnuts, eggs, and arugula. And hey, if you want to keep the budget intact, nothing wrong with spaghetti della casa. Lunch Tuesday through Friday; dinner nightly. Moderate to expensive. — *E.B.* (2/04)

DMood 4628 Park Boulevard (at University Heights overhead street sign), 619-297-6663. This delightfully decorated bistro offers eclectic Middle Eastern cuisine that's primarily Persian but offers touches of North Africa, India, Southern Europe, and the U.S. Don't miss the splended appetizer sampler (a full array of luscious Middle Eastern tapas), the pomegranate-glazed game hen stuffed with basmati rice and fruit, or the skewered lamb. The daily fresh fish gives talented chef Cecilia Tajonar a chance for creative play. Persian ice creams in sexy flavors (rosewater, orange blossom, pistachio) are among the dessert choices. Live entertainment at many brunches and weekend dinners provide vibrant cultural experience. Interesting teas (including Persian and Moroccan); okay wine list; full bar. Reservations urged for large groups (call after noon). Street parking. Street patio in front and court-yard in back for al fresco dining in fair weather. Numerous vegetarian/vegan choices. Half-size salads available by request. Brunch Saturday and Sunday. Dinner nightly until 11 p.m., bar menu until midnight or later. Moderate. — N.W. (2/06)

Extraordinary Desserts 1430 Union Street (at Ash), Little Italy, 619-294-7001; also 2929 Fifth Avenue, uptown, 619-294-2132. Patrons looking for a quiet dessert still cling to the original charming cottage near Balboa Park. Those wanting more of a meal head for the newer Little Italy location, a vast, noisy space with industrial-chic decor and a menu of eclectic small plates — *mezze* spreads, bruschettas, sandwiches, and cheese plates. Flavors tend to be intense; some creations (such as a bacon-cured salmon sand wich and *pantelleria*, a celery-date spread) are wonderful, others are exhausting even in small portions. Both locations offer pastry cases full of desserts that live up to "extraordinary, to eat on-site or to take home. Chefowner Karen Krasne's incorporates fla-vors inspired by the global reach of her travels, from the cooking schools of Paris to the rice fields of Bali. The white cakes are food for angels. Wines (including champagnes), beers, fruit elixirs. Vegetarian-friendly menu. Both locations are open seven days, three meals, closing at 11 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and at midnight on weekends, Moderate, - N.W. (2/05)

Gulf Coast Grill 4130 Park Boulevard (between University and El Cajon), Hillcrest, 619-295-2244. The Gulf's faux-rustic, woodsy dining rooms and patio are great hangouts if you like a restaurant with a noisy party atmosphere. The menu focuses on the cuisine of the South and Southwest, with an emphasis on Louisiana and a heavy hand on the salt shaker. The kitchen does best with the straight Southern dishes, turning out divine fried soft-shelled crabs, airy hush puppies, and delicious little corn muffins.

If you're deeply familiar with Cajun-Creole flavors, though, don't look for pure authenticity — you'll do better with jambalaya, étouffée, or the lunchtime oyster po' boy than with the soulless gumbo or the misconceived red beans and rice. Heated, smokerfriendly front patio. Wheelchair elevator to restrooms next to stairs. Free parking lot left of the door. Full bar. Lunch Monday through Saturday, brunch Sunday, dinner nightly (early closing Sunday). Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

Harney Sushi 3964 Harney Street (off Congress), Old Town, 619-295-3272. This friendly little spot on a side street serves as a secret haven of pretty-good sushi just a few steps from Old Town's nonstop tacos and margaritas. You can also get sashimi, Japanese appetizers, and a few mixedethnicity entrées (noodles, pasta, teriyaki, tempura) made with seafood or chicken breast. Beef is served, but numerous dishes are vegetarian. Good sake list. Sound system runs loud inside; patio dining available in warm weather. Reservations for sushi bar accepted but not necessarily honored. Open weekdays for lunch, dinner nightly until midnight, with a DJ on Friday and Saturday. Sushi prices lower than most, entrées inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

Joe's New York-Style Deli Royal Food Mart, 3401 First Avenue (at Upas), Banker's Hill, 619-295-7666. You enter a time machine: A cavernous concrete-floored deli that dates back to 1902, with a high ceiling, acorn-shaped hanging lights, and a big old-fashioned cooler-counter packed with cheeses, hams, and sausage meat. Old display cases carry olives, pâté, Ryvitas. A sawed-off wooden barrel bulges with Hungarian wines. Go for wraps, jumbo hot dogs with sauerkraut, or East Coast-generous sandwiches like corned beef, dry Genoa salami, cotto salami, bologna, or liverwurst. That Boars Head liverwurst is da bomb. Caesar

salad with chicken or a cup of tortellini soup are good light alternatives. Open breakfast through early dinner daily. — E.B. (4/05)

Prado House of Hospitality, Balboa Park, 619-557-9441. In a magical space at the heart of Balboa Park, Prado features cute neo-Nouveau decor and a something-for-everyone menu of American-Mexican-Italian-with-Asian-touches cuisine. The food brings few surprises, but is flavorful and served in huge portions. Top choices include meaty crab cakes and an astonishingly tender, slow-roasted pork loin. A meringue-based banana tres leches cake is everyone's favorite dessert. The bar makes a nice stop during a museum-crawl and offers ethereal fried oysters and a range of gussiedup margaritas. Keep an eye out for special prix fixe dinners that include tickets to museum exhibitions. Dinner reservations vital. Vast interior can be noisy, but heated, umbrella-topped terrace tables are quiet and scenic. Moderate to a little expensive, with reasonable wine list. — *N.W.* (12/00)

Region 3671 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania), Hillcrest, 619-299-6499. Two of our best young chefs — Michael Stebner and Allyson Colwell — are creating inventive, daily-changing menus inspired by superb seasonal ingredients from local farms and artisans. The decor is rustic and the style is "pure and simple" to showcase the intense flavors of wild-caught fish and naturally raised meats and produce. Don't miss the house-made cheeses and brilliantly unconventional desserts. You can order à la carte, or a whole table can share a well-priced "trust the chef" tasting dinner drawn mainly from the evening's menu, with an optional matching wine-flight. An adventurous wine list at reasonable markups adds to the fun and the bartender offers inventive cocktails. Reservations urged, especially for weekends. Restaurant is up four stairs; wheelchair lift available (ask bartender). Can be noisy, banquettes are

quietest. Dinner Tuesday through Sunday. High moderate. — *N.W.* (1/05)

Saffron Noodles and Sate 3737 India Street, South Mission Hills, 619-574-7737. It's the smell of the spicy chicken grilling that will get you every time. Whatever the recipe is — and Su-Mei Yu, the owner and celebrated cookbook author, says it's from the Isaan, Thailand's ethnic Lao Northeast — it catches your nose. We're talking "boxing arena grilled chicken," after the place where she smelled its spicy cooking aromas while growing up in Bangkok. You have a choice of five sauces to go with the chicken, from peanut to sweet pepper. Also try the noodle soups, like Tomm Yam with shrimp: sinus-clearing, delicious, and surprisingly filling. The food here is real, fresh, genuine Thai cuisine with Chinese echoes — like Su-Mei Yu her-self. Middle-class San Diego seems to have adopted her eatery, despite the fact you're in a pretty stark gray-andwhite room with views of I-5. Open for lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. - E.B. (3/04)

Talus Cafe 127 University Avenue (near First Street), Hillcrest, 619-358-9867. If you're looking for food that tastes rich but registers lean on your bathroom scale, chef-owner Richard Wood creates eclectic, Mediterranean-style healthy cuisine made with seasonal, mainly organic produce, wild-caught seafood, lean meats, and very little butter or cream. (However, some dishes, e.g., meatloaf, can be quite salty.) The menu wanders all over southern Europe and includes side-trips to Southeast Asia (the latter aren't very authentic, but they're tasty). The small, smart wine list offers plenty by the glass, and is affordable (Monday is half off all bottles, too). Breads are house-baked, but desserts are outsourced. Heated, roofed courtyard dining; dining room is up one steep step. Street parking, Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Friday, brunch and dinner weekends; only dinner Monday. Lunches inexpensive, moderate. — N.W. (1/06)

Zocalo Grill 2444 San Diego Avenue (a block north of Old Town Cemetery), Old Town. 619-298-9840. This casual, festive spinoff of the Brigantine chain features "Pacific coastal cuisine," an eclectic international hodgepodge with a faint Mexican accent and "something for everyone." And some of those somethings are delicious — a stacked salad of shrimp and avocados, or coconut-shrimp kebabs emerging from a pineapple, or a huge, beautifully grilled spiny lobster with avocado salsa. Ap-

petizers are discounted at happy hour, and you can make a whole dinner out of substantial "tapas" sized for sharing. The heated, semi-roofed outdoor terrace encourages al fresco dining yearround. Full bar with creative margaritas, eight draft beers, and California wines including Brigantine's own custom blends at good prices. Wheelchair lift in back, ramp at south side of terrace. Reservations strongly advised for weekends. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (10/02)

Bandar Fine Persian Cuisine 825 and 837 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-0101. In a comfortable setting, the Persian menu offers just a "pick hits ist" of popular dishes culled from this fabled cuisine, but the cooking is first rate, featuring fine ingredients prepared with care, skill, and healthfulness. The superlative lamb-and-rice stuffed grape leaves are vibrant with fresh herbs. The "Bandar Special" entrée combo lets you choose any two kebabs (chicken, game hen, beef, or lamb), beautifully marinated and cooked to your order. Entrées featuring rice with poultry are elaborate and refined, spiked with tangy barberries, sour cherries, or lentils and dates. The list of Persian desserts now includes Persian ice cream, a rose-scented exotic treat. Open daily for lunch (limited menu) and dinner. Moderate.

Blue Point 565 Fifth Avenue (at Market), Gaslamp, 619-233-6623. In a handsome, plushy dining room, pristine seafood and Prime-grade steaks and chops are featured in well-focused preparations highlighting Pacific Rim and Mediterranean flavors. A fine lobster bisque includes plenty of lobster, and crab-stuffed trout and dayboat scallops are among the highlights of the menu. But at this conventioneers' favorite, be sure to specify the doneness you prefer, especially for fish, which defaults to well-done. Valet parking onsite, or inexpensive self-parking one block east at Park It On Market. Large sidewalk dining patio. Business-casual dress looks best here. Reservations urged. Dinner nightly. — N.W. (9/05)

Broadway Pizza 1008 Broadway (at Tenth Street), downtown, 619-232-6264. This restaurant, near the downtown Senior Center and City College, offers no-nonsense Italian-American food. And they're not skimpy: from a pizza slice to barbecue

beef sandwiches to a Louisiana-style sausage link sub, portions are generous. If you want a hearty dinner, try the whole slab of beef ribs, with veggies, garlic bread, and salad. Unfortunately, the quality has dropped; the formerly fine pizza, for instance, is now marred by oily, low-grade mozzarella and not-so-great optional deli-meat toppings. But the main thing is, while the rest of downtown snores, they're still open, from 10 a.m. to to 3 a.m., seven days. And they'll even deliver to nearby neighborhoods. Inexpensive. — N.W. (9/03)

China Too 916 Fifth Avenue (near E Street), Gaslamp, 619-239-4283 or 619-239-1456. Don't blink or you'll miss this Gaslamp bargain. The menu claims "New York-Style Fine Chinese Cuisine." Would you settle for decent Brooklyn- or Bronx-style eat-in/takeout? Here vou're getting cheap-butgood Chinese fare for the price of a cup of soup nearby. Lunch specials (with soup, two egg rolls, rice) include green pepper steak with onions, kung pau hot chicken, beef broccoli, shrimp with veggies — all made with no MSG and minimal cornstarch. The owner's last place was in New York, where customers ranged from Kofi Annan to Robin Leach. Chef Chen even has some of his old dishes here, on a page of multi-regional "chef specialties" (#90 to #107 on the menu). But what really makes this a "New York-ish" spot will bring joy to hungry mouths all over the restaurant-starved stretch east and south of Balboa Park: free delivery from I-8 to Harbor Drive, from Pacific Highway to 805 or even further. Open 11 a.m. to 10 p.m.; closed Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/06)


Downtown Johnny Brown's 1220 Third Avenue (in the Community Concourse at Third and B), downtown, 619-232-8414. Walk up through the Community Concourse past the ship fountain and bingo! — downtown's answer to a European sidewalk café. Place has a generous patio of chairs and umbrellas. All green and white. You get two types here: sportminded types (a dozen TV screens, Chargers, Padres, Aztecs banners inside), and city government workers. Burger are good, but try the breast of chicken burger with soup of the day or chicken burger with soup of the day or chicken burger with soup of steady or chicken's grilled, edge-burnt, spicy. Soup's bobbing with fresh-cut vegetables. Also, salads: taco or Southwest Chicken. What's best: sitting outside and watching people — not traffic — bustle by. — E.B. (4/03)

This spirited, colorful saloon, physically transported wholehog from the Ould Sod, offers delicious Irish music live most nights, and also attempts serious Irish cooking — with some successes. Try the lovely herbrich Irish stew, or the boxty, potato crépes rolled around your choice from a variety of fillings (salmon, beef, etc.). Or start the day here with a huge, carnivorous Irish breakfast. Open daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/01)


Greystone 658 Fifth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-0225. The Italian steakhouse fare here centers on dry-aged prime beef, game meats (including exceptionally tender bison), lobster, and pastas as the main draws, with indifferent starters and desserts. An impressive wine list offers rewarding California and Italian bottlings at \$35 to \$50, but roars up to the stratosphere of first-growth Bordeaux, super-Tuscans and scandalously overpriced Napa reds. Monsoon Exotic Cuisine of In**dia** 729 Fourth Avenue (off G Street), Gaslamp, 619-234-5555. The younger sister to Hillcrest's Bombay Exotic Cui sine shares the same chefs and serves much the same standard repertory of "Northern Indian cuisine made easy, with a few tropical additions vaguely inspired by Southern flavors. Curries are indistinct from each other and run to the mild side, no matter what you specify. Breads are good; tandooris disappointingly soft-surfaced. A room-dividing fountain recreates the roar of the namesake tropical downpour. Add a lively dinner crowd and it's a (Gunga) din. Solid wine list, some Indian beers, full bar specializing in sweet cocktails, Open daily. Inexpensive buffet lunches moderate à la carte dinners until 11 p.m. — N.W. (10/04)

Mr. Tiki's Mai Tai Lounge 801 Fifth Avenue (at F Street), Gaslamp 619-233-1183. If you loved Trader Vic's (or can remember it, anyway), you may be amused at the revival of the genre here. Check out the "grass skirt" decor with huge tiki gods and the vaguely "islander" cuisine featuring, in addition, asian fusion items, elementary sushiand the occasional sprint into fusioncuisine seafood. But, as you might guess, the greatest creativity in the house goes into the silly umbrella cocktails, and those are mainly delish. Age 21 and over after 9 p.m. (even with parents). Dinner nightly. Cocktails until 11 p.m., weekends until 1 a.m. Moderate. — *N.W.* (10/04)

Osetra 904 Fifth Avenue (at E Street), Gaslamp, 619-239-1800. Possibly the most expensive restaurant in San Diego. Osetra is named for a precious, near-endangered caviar (which it serves) and attracts patrons who enjoy throwing their money around. The atmosphere is pure Las Vegas, with two floors of loud ambient music, glitzy décor, and a "wine angel" in black tights hoisting herself around a gleaming glass tower to fetch your precious bottle. Celebrities and big spenders get attentive service, others take their chances. The menu is mostly seafood, but it, too, carries the Vegas imprimatur of vulgar bad taste. Too many bold flavors are at

war on almost every plate, and even the simplest dishes are overwrought frenzies of fusion Best bets for satisfying your palate and curiosity: raw oysters, the cold seafood platter, caviar (if your wallet and conscience can afford it). Disabled access to first-floor dining room only. Full bar. Dinner nightly, Sunday through Thursday to 10 p.m., Friday and Saturday to 11:30 p.m. Reserve well ahead. Exorbitant. -N.W. (10/04)

The Palm 615 I Street (at Sixth Avenue), Gaslamp, 619-702-6500. This up-market chain steakhouse, open since 1926, claims to be the oldest familyoperated white-tablecloth restaurant in the country, and it's spread all over the country as well. The Gaslamp branch, its 30th, is just like all the other branches, even down to decor details, which is the whole point — business travelers with contacts to impress can rely on it wherever they go. The fare features tender, wet-aged USDA Prime beef from the chain's own wholesale butcher and, for the really high-rollers, monster-sized Nova Scotia lobsters. Other good dishes are Shrimp Bruno (with a Dijon sauce), baked crab cakes with no filler, and the "Slater Special" which combines the last two in an appetizer. Don't eat meat, but do eat garlic? Try clams and shrimp *posillippo* and scare off the vampires. All dishes à la carte. Portions are generally gigantic on up. Key lime pie (a normal-sized wedge) makes a good, tart dessert, and clean *macchinettas* make outstanding espresso. Excellent wine list, plenty by the glass; full bar. Valet parking. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Very expensive. — N.W. (2/06)

Be hind all the Panda Express fast-food stops is the smaller, more serious Panda Inn chain which originated many of the now-familiar dishes of semi-Americanized "Mandarin" cuisine (they claim to have invented orange chicken, and their version is vastly better than those at the 99-cent joints). Salt-andpepper shrimp, tofu with eggplant, and meatball casserole with Chinese cab bage are among the more authentic choices. Preparations here are generally clean and greaseless with well-balanced flavors; spicy dishes are moderately hot unless you request otherwise. It's not the spot for high adventure, but it does offer dishes for all tastes. Moderate-priced banquet menus make this a good choice for family gatherings. Full bar. Po Pazzo 1917 India Street (at Grape), Little Italy, 619-238-1917. The restaurant's name means "a little crazy," but owner Joe Busalacchi was crazy like a fox to open the first seri-ously swanky eatery in Little Italy. The decor resembles the set of a Manhattan supper club in a black-and-white movie, right down to the gray color scheme and curvy booths. Music plays loudly (with a live pianist Thursday through Saturday), keeping the energy and noise levels high. You almost expect to see Frankie and Dino at the next table. The USDA Prime steaks are flashroasted in a special oven at 1700 degrees (in the style of Ruth's Chris), and if they're a little chewy, they're also flavorful - especially the "Sicilian steak." But the pasta dishes are even better, and the veggies accompanying the entrées often outshine the proteins — the kitchen is still Italian at heart and the fundamental things apply. Full bar. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner only weekends. Reservations advised. Expensive. — *N.W.* (10/04)

Sluggers by the Ball Park 1219 Market Street (at Park), downtown, 619-546-5973. Not your typical hot dog stand. Sluggers café is all glass, steel, cinder block, and new. This eatery catches much of the Padres business, selling Vienna-brand beef hot dogs and Polish sausages. "Served Chicago-Style" — meaning, the dog's topped with tomato wedges, mustard, pickle, relish, onions, and peppers, all, they say, on a steamed poppy-seed bun from Chicago. Other goodies from the Windy City include the Comiskey Park Pole (a charbroiled Polish sausage dog) and the Italian Stallion (charbroiled Italian sausage in bun). Place is still a little cinderblocky but a good rendezvous for a brewski and a dog after work. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/05)

Taka 555 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-338-0555. The seafood at this always-packed sushi bar and Japanese appetizer-restaurant is top quality. Ama ebi (sweet shrimp) from the live tank go down soft and silky smooth, unlike their frozen brethren. And the chefs are highly skilled: the well-seasoned rice is freshly made all evening, and for once the spicy scallop hand roll has scallops, mayo, cuke, and hot pep-per running all the way through, not just plopped on top. Savory appetizers supplement the sushi, including misobaked black cod and mushroom-topped *agedashi* (lightly-fried) tofu. The one problem: the later you arrive, the louder it gets. Make reservations, and if you value your ears, go at an early hour. Dinner nightly. Most dishes inexpensive, but many little bites can eat a hole in your wallet. — N.W. (7/04)

Tamale Cart Outside Rancho Fresco. 1852 National Avenue, Barrio Logan, 619-338-9140. If you've ever wondered what it would be like to eat as the Aztecs ate, come here and try some of the tamales — classic Aztec food — in all their flavors. Tamales are sort of steamed cornmeal dumplings wrapped in corn husks, served with sauce. The choice of goodies stuffed in the middle can include strips of pork, beef, chicken, or cheese, as well as pineapple, strawberries, or coconut. While vou're at it, try the traditional accompaniment, the *champurrado* drink: milk mixed with *masa* — ground corn meal — chocolate, and cinnamon. In this mainly Spanish-speaking market you can sit, watch, and pick up a few bargains too. Tamales make a great breakfast. Three should do you. These are made by the Restaurant Chia-paneco up at 25th and Market. Open breakfast through late lunch, seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B* (10/02)

Top of the Market 750 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-234-4867. The upper-crust upper floor of the downtown Fish Market (see Multiple Locations listing) has largely the same food as the downstairs, plus a few luxury items (e.g., abalone) and occasionally some creative appetizer specials. Prices are about 25% higher for identical items, in exchange for a slightly elevated view and a dressier, whitetablecloth setting that's almost "formal" by San Diego standards — flip-flops and tank tops aren't allowed on men, and collared shirts (e.g., polos) are suggested at dinner. That doesn't mean that the atmosphere is quietly gracious — the room's just as huge, packed, and raucous as the lower realms, even on the terrace. Reserve, and expect a short wait anyway. Elevator provides wheelchair access. Open daily. Expensive. — N.W. (9/01)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

El Dorado 311 Palomar (at 3rd Avenue), Chula Vista, 426-4545. The food of Peru is arguably the zestiest in South America, and Chula Vista's growing Peruvian community expects authenticity. El Dorado is there for them. The papa relleno is pure bliss — a little foot-ball of creamy mashed potatoes, lightly fried around a filling of ground beef,

olives, and raisins. Seco de cabrito features young goat in a complex, herbed stew exploding with cilantro. Peruvian ceviche is lively and garnished with chancho, smoked homin -corn kernels Alas, here in the far north, the cuisine's fire is tuned way down for the kiddies — but there's always hot sauce. Reflecting the local population, half the menu here is Mexican — not tacos but more serious dinner dishes, especially seafood, carried out with above-average flair. Three meals, seven days. Inexpensive to moderate.

The Family House of Pancakes 562 Broadway (across from Chula Vista Center), Chula Vista, 619-425-5133. This is a great place for three things: your family, your kids, and your ap petite. The restaurant is famous for its 'Grandma's" buckwheat pancakes, its banana-pecan pancake, and its rolled pancakes, oozing with berries and topped with cream and powdered sugar. Just try and survive their 8-12 egg omelet! Other good bets include a deluxe burger with French fries, tomatoes, and house sauce, and a grilled tuna sandwich with fries. Breakfast/lunch only, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Island Pasta 1202 Orange Avenue (at Loma Street), Coronado, 619-435-4545. This unassuming, spillout-on-the-street restaurant somehow got it right. Simple tables on the sidewalk, daily made-on-the-premises semolina pasta, most dishes costing in the single digits. A simple fettuccine Alfredo is a pleasure al fresco with a glass of wine, sparkling against the fresh flowers on the table, watching Coronado's world go by. One good — and vegetarian — special to ask for is the verdure pasta, a combo of artichoke hearts, spinach, capers, mushrooms, onions, and olives over spaghettini. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

La Bella Pizza Garden 373 Third Avenue (at F Street), Chula Vista, 619-426-8820. From the outside, La Bella looks like an Italian farmhouse, with geraniums, bright green shutters,

and maroon canopies. A real extended family runs this business. Their secrets are: long hours (from breakfast until after midnight daily), big meals, and small prices. The menu includes standards like spaghetti with meatballs or lasagna, including sides of garlic bread, soup, or salad. The hit with kids is pa's Favorite," an 8-inch pizza with mushrooms, pepperoni, and sausage. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/01)

Mary J's Cafe 1930 Cleveland Avenue, National City, 619-477-6645 or 619-477-5306. Mary J and her café have been around for 40 years and about the only thing to change is the prices. This is the real National City. The regulars start piling in at 5 a.m. Mary always has specials going, but check the big board menu above the stove too. One of their most popular items is the Trucker's Breakfast (three eggs, ham, bacon or sausage, home fries, and toast), or steak and eggs with hash browns and toast. Mary's son Vic, the morning cook, always gives you more than enough. For lunch or early dinner, try the meat loaf with mixed veggies, boiled potatoes covered with gravy, toast, and soup or salad. Or chicken-fried steak with all the fixings. Also hefty: cheeseburgers or tuna melts (with fries plus soda included in the price) and that old Amer ican favorite, a fried egg sandwich with chips. dense dinner crowd from the nearby Del. The prime-time wait for a table may be worth it if you're in a gringo Mex mood, especially if you've got kids in tow. Although the cooking is blandly pleasant (even the guacamole is underseasoned), it's surprisingly painstak-ing. Soups are built on fine stocks, salads can be vibrant, and seafood is treated so tenderly that the numerous shellfish-stuffed tortilla concoctions (shrimp enchiladas, lobster burritos) are positively luscious. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. — N.W. (9/00)

Tin Fish Imperial Beach Pier, 910 Seacoast Drive, Imperial Beach, 619-628-8414. At a table by this fish shack at the far end of the pier, you can watch people and pigeons (and people feeding pigeons) as you dig into huge portions of simple seafood, appetized by the sea air. The bill of fare features fish — fried, grilled, chowdered, or wrapped into burritos, tacos, or sandwiches. The big fried combos are about what you'd expect, but more piquant pleasures come in smaller packages. (Portions are generous, whatever you order.) The spicy fish tacos are really spicy, while the fried onion rings are of surpassing delicacy. Best of all, the crab cakes are huge and seriously crabby, with plenty of meat and very little filler. Live music during summer, good vibes all the time. "Tin Fish Shuttle" (50 cents) runs from parking lot to the restaurant. A second branch at 170 Sixth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-8100, offers patio dining across from the Convention Center Both locations open daily for lunch and early dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (7/01)

BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit

Chiki Jai Avenida Revolución #1388 (at 8th), Zona Centro, Tijuana, 685-4955. Eat here and vou're surrounded by ghosts: Errol Flynn, John Huston, Rita Hayworth, Anthony Quinn, Ava Gardner, and, they say, Ernest Hemingway, who all ate — and drank vino tinto — here. Plus the great stars of boxing and bullfighting. But mainly it was a haven for Spanish jai alai players desperate for Old Country food. This is one of Tijuana's great historic eateries, its tale written on the walls. Old border photos, Don Quixote art, fighting bull ranchos' brands, and a matador's framed green cape with his blood still on it. The food's all Spanish, so paella is big (with soup, salad, French bread, and bleu cheese), but also try the baby eel appetizers, chorizo (pork sausages), bacalao (cod fish) a la Vizcaina, trout with olive oil and garlic, and Gallican octopus. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. -E.B. (5/02)

El Nido Boulevard Benito Juárez #67 (1-1/2 blocks north of Hotel Festival Plaza), Rosarito Beach, Baja, 661-612-1430. Head south if you're looking for a great dry-aged, mesquitebroiled steak at a bargain price - but don't stop there. Try the house specialty, quail with garlic sauce (*codor*niz al mojo de ajo), or venison, especially the savory machaca de venado (strips of meat with peppers, onions, and tomatoes). Both are locally raised on the restaurant's own ranches, and may be united in a brilliant breakfast of quail eggs with deer *machaca*. Seafood and surf-and-turf variations are tasty, too. The restaurant's name means "the nest" and the amusing indoor-outdoor decor is a sort of multiroom aviary with birds singing, chirping, and fluttering all over. Full bar. If sensitive to smoke, don't sit next to the mesquite-burning hearth on the roofed patio. Dressy-casual. Bilingual staff and menu. Open daily, early

morning to late evening. Mostly moderate; cash only. — *N.W.* (4/03)

La Diferencia Avenida Sánchez Taboada 10611-A, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-3346 or 634-7078 Mexican haute cuisine, with inventive combinations of traditional flavors. The creative menu reframes the old dishes and devises new ones. Wine list centers on Baja wineries (Monte Xanic and Cetto) at reasonable prices. Secure, free valet parking next to exterior courtyard. Menu is in Spanish (in a hard-to-read font), but some staffers speak some English. The restaurant is often noisy, even louder when mariachis play. Smoking permitted. Wheelchair access marginal. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* (1/02)

La Fonda Roberto's Avenida Cuahutémoc #2800 (at Agua Caliente Boulevard), Tijuana, 686-4687. How often do you get to eat something totally new? Like *huazontle*, the Aztecs' "red spinach"? Roberto's presents it as an egg-covered mass of baby sprigs wrapped around a sausage of Monterrey cheese, all swimming in a chocolatey mole sauce. You haul the *hua*zontle branches through your teeth to de-seed them, just as Montezuma did 500 years ago. This is the fascination of Roberto Reyes's eatery. It's a tribute to his home state of Puebla in the heartland of Mexico. Cactus plays a big part: Dedos Montezuma ("Montezuma's fingers") is cactus stuffed with steak; torta de camaron seco is a shrimp patty topped with cactus; cecina Oaxaqueña is cured meat with cactus salad But there're also steaks, mole poblano (chocolatey chicken with seven different chiles), and the delicious chile en nogada (chile pepper stuffed with beef, fruits, and nuts — fried in egg and covered with creamy nut sauce). Nice dining room too — built around a fountain. Open 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.; closed Monday. Moderate. — *E.B.* (2/05)

Los Pelícanos Calle de Cedro 115 #45 (west of Juarez), Rosarito Beach, Baja, 661-612-0445 or 661-612-1757. This hotel dining room is El Nido's little (and less gifted) sister, with a shorter menu and perhaps less careful cooking. It serves good steaks and surfand-turf in a handsome room and, at lunch, on a pretty ocean-view terrace. To find it, look for large sign on west side of Juarez, north of the tourist hub, directing you to the site. One winding flight up to the restaurant, no elevator. Bilingual staff and menu. Full bar. Open daily, three meals. Moderate; cash only. — N.W. (4/03)

Mercado Sobre Ruedas (From Tijuana, on toll road, take first Rosarito exit; turn left at third traffic light then an immediate right onto Colonia Lucio Blanco.) Don't miss this huge flea market that materializes every Sunday (from morning until mid-afternoon) a couple of miles north of the tourist part of town. Its dozens of food-booths offer a vast variety of local treats, ranging from barbecued mut-ton (borrego) to savory Jalisco-style goat stew (birria de chivo) to all manner of tacos, made-to-order hotcakes with syrup, "Mexican hamburgers," and Sno-Kones (don't worry about the ice: by law, it has to be made with purified water). The food is totally authentic, cooked to Mexican tastes, and it's a carnival for the mouth. Many vendors speak some English. Rock-bottom prices; cash only. — N.W. (4/03)

Tacos Varios y Aguas Frescas Corner of Constitución and 3rd, Tijuana. This is "just" a cart, but don't let that stop your making the effort. Students, local businesspeople, and workers agree: this is the real thing. It's always causing a people-bulge on the sidewalk. However, the cart is only here from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m., so you have to time it right. But from tongue to chicken mole, to *milanesa*, steak ranchero, *carne asada*, *chile relleno*, and pescado (fish), they create really big taco meals right there. Bonus: standing around chomping in the street is a great way to meet people and practice your Spanish. Nighttime only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/04)

MULTIPLE LOCATIONS

Anthony's Fish Grotto $1360\,$ North Harbor Drive (at Ash Street), downtown, 619-232-5103; 215 West Boulevard, Chula Vista, 619-425-4200; 9530 Murray Drive, La Mesa, 619-463-0368. You're going to get a sore neck at the downtown flagship of this local chain, splitting your time between your meal, your partner, and the harbor scene outside. If you don't want over-complicated food, Anthony's obliges. Fish and chips is still the simplest and the best. Or Mama's Platter, cod combined with batter-fried calamari, shrimp, oysters, scallops, and clam strips. Anthony's has been up and running for six decades now, with the buying power to get the pick of the catch. The menu offers 18 different seasonal fish to choose from, plus — if you've got the bread — delicious lobster dishes (in season) like lobster thermidor with a creamy

winey sauce. Try to be there at sunset when the water-sky show will do its darndest to distract you. No reserva-tions. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Moderate. — E.B. (12/05)

Fish House Vera Cruz 360 Via Vera Cruz (in back of "Restaurant Row"), San Marcos, 760-744-7346. Additional locations in Carlsbad and Temecula. This affordable seafood eatery packs in diners like sardines. Fresh fish and lots of it is the happenin thing. On a recent day, 23 different fresh fish selections were available as daily specials, on top of the regular menu of crab, lobster, oysters, shrimp, catfish, etc. All fish is grilled plain, with nothing added but a dab of tartar sauce. The seafood is so fresh you don't really mind. Each entrée includes a choice of side dishes, two for lunch and three for dinner. The Manhattan chowder is especially tasty, as is their "krab" salad. This is an ideal place for families, but don't even think of it for a romantic meal out. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. S.M. (3/04)

The Fish Market 750 North Har-

bor Drive, downtown, 619-232-3474. There's something fishy about these crowded, noisy, ever-multiplying restaurants — namely, mesquitegrilled, skewered, steamed, or panko-fried seafood, plus piscine chowders, pastas, and salads. Preparations are generally simple and consistent among locations. All the raw seafood is pro cessed at the chain's Northern California facilities, so when the menu refers to a "local" species it merely means it's from somewhere in the Pacific. Small retail fish market in the downtown branch offers slightly fresher products than most supermar kets. Identical products and dishes are served in the dining room, the oyster bar, and at Top of the Market. But the sushi bar is emphatically the top Fish Market venue, with just-right rice, pristine seafood, and expert preparation. The "Ichiban Hamachi" (also available in the dining rooms) is outstanding - and for a sexy treat, share a pair of "Honeymoon Oysters" with your honey. No reservations, but the space is vast so waits are brief. Restaurant open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. Also in Del Mar at 640 Via Del Valle, 858-755-2277; mini-branch near Fashion Valley, 2401 Fenton Parkway, 619-280-2277. — N.W. (9/01)

Il Fornaio 1333 First Street, Coronado, 619-437-4911. Also at Del Mar Plaza, 1555 Camino Del Mar, Del Mar, 858-755-8876. Il Fornaio's defensive architecture walls it off from the Great Unwashed — the tourists wandering around Coronado's Old Ferry Landing — but it's worth breaching if only to get your teeth into their to-die-for bread. "Il fornaio" means "the baker," after all. Beyond bread, we're talking rustic-feeling, herbal, ultra-fresh sal-ads, and everyday Italian dishes ranging from sfilatino con bistecchina (thin grilled steak on a baguette with creamy dijon and salad) to a giant mesquite-grilled 22-ounce bistecca alla fiorentina, with lots of vegetarian and pasta dishes in between. A simple penne alla sorrentina - pasta tubes with a tomato, mozzarella, and basil sauce — is charming. Pizza *puttanesca* is heaven too, if you're into anchovies. Interesting regional menus from different provinces of Italy pop up during the first two weeks of each month. Most staffers seem mind-blowingly knowledgeable. Moderate. — E.B. (1/02)













Sweet Wench

"Come brother, take a head, and in this hand the other I will bear."

omething appealing, something appalling...a comedy tonight!" The Old Globe's *Titus Andronicus* opens with Zero Mostel's curtain-raiser from *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum*. The music

and two long strips of yellow caution tape across the stage signal director Darko Tresjnak's intentions: this version of Shakespeare's revenge tragedy will be "some-

thing impulsive, something repulsive." But not something for everyone.

Titus is the runt of Shakespeare's litter. Most likely it was his first attempt at tragedy, and most critics wish the gory potboiler had never been penned. Shakespeare's early works resemble an audition by a brilliant young actor. The performance demonstrates all the basics of the genre but also can't hide a "watch me," often forced, virtuosity. Shakespeare plays "can I top this?" Comedy of Errors piles up so many complications you swear he couldn't add another. Then he does. Then does again.

In King Lear, Edgar says, "The worst is not / Not so long as we can say 'this is the worst." Like an extended, over-the-top commentary on these lines, Titus Andronicus loads one unthinkable atrocity onto another. Just when you'd swear humans are incapable of worse violence — or when you wish the Bard would take charge and turn his Roman Chainsaw Massacre into something more useful — he heaps another cruelty on the pile.

Toward the end of Act One, Scene Three, for example, as parts of bodies litter the stage, Titus says, "Come brother, take a head, and in this hand" — since his other's been chopped off — "the other [head] I will bear." He also tells Lavinia,

who had her hands chopped off and tongue cut out, to carry an arm and "Bear thou my hand, sweet wench, between thy teeth." He had to be putting his audience

on! At the same time he packs the play with literary and historical precedents for each violent act — from Ovid, Seneca, and Roman mythology — as if there's nothing new under the sun.

After 10 years of fighting the Goths and 40 years of service to Rome, Titus has lost 21 of his 25 sons in battle. But just when the returning hero merits sympathy, he kills another son for blocking his path: his passions, he claims, being as "bottomless" as his sorrows. He also makes a grave mistake. Without an emperor, Rome is "headless" (you can almost hear the young Bard giggling at his verbal twists). Titus refuses the scepter and casts his vote for weak Saturninus, because he's the oldest candidate. Others rule Saturninus. Mayhem ensues.

In the midst of the brutality, the young Shakespeare nudges toward a theme: Job without God. "Ruler of great heavens," Titus quotes Seneca, "dost thou so calmly hear crimes, calmly look on them?" Battle gave Titus a kind of order, even rationalizations for his losses. But godless Rome







has become a "wilderness" of tigers. No religious rubric justifies the gore.

'There is enough written upon this earth / To stir a mutiny in the mildest of thoughts," says Titus's brother Marcus. But, he adds, the heavens no longer "compassion" humankind. Titus becomes obsessed with justice. Finding none in the universe, he dispenses it with ever-expanding cycles of violence. In a parody of the "natural order," Titus shows that what revenge does best is nurture itself.

For the Old Globe, inventive director Darko Tresnjak resets the lunacy in modern times. Titus - played by Leonard Kelly-Young as a vaguely sentient being/Fourth Stooge wears fatigues. When Tamora, the evil Goth brought to Rome in a tiger cage, becomes "incorporate," her posse dresses like a CEO's sycophants in suits and shades. The hunters in Act Two look eager to commit buck fever Texas-style. The moderndress look, however, only

contemporizes the obvious.

Whether or not Shakespeare was ready to tackle high tragedy is hard to say. Even if he did, the "murders, rapes, and massacres / Acts of black night. abominable deeds, / Complots of mischief, treason, villanies" undercut any attempt. Revenge tragedy rules. It's almost as if the play's a deliberate send-up of the blood-bathed genre.

Tresnjak treats it that way.

Most of the pain is "bang!" "pow!" — literally: the sound effects come from Batman comic book variety. Blood becomes red confetti, or long red ribbons, or red fans opening up. In the production's most amazing scene, Tresnjak solves an age-old problem: how to handle poor Lavinia's entrance — her tongue cut out, her hands chopped off - and Marcus's seemingly out-ofplace, lengthy poetic ramblings? Melissa Condren's battered Lavinia comes onstage. Red powder spills from her stumps like hourglasses. When he sees her, Charles Janasz's Marcus begins to speak and, what? take off a shoe? No. He's pulling out shoelace. Then the other. The shoelaces become tourniquets he applies to poor

Lavinia. Her mute agony and his tender ministrations make the scene unforgettable.

Strangely, it's one of the few times the production doesn't retreat from genuine emotion or undercut it with blatant shtick — as when tongueless Lavinia tries to say "hel-LOW' and ends up saying "huhwhoa?"; or when a limb gets lopped off the Beatles sing "I Want to Hold Your Hand"; or during intermission, when a

voice croons "Take all of me..."

As Tamora's sons go "braving" for humans in the forest to the tune of "Teddy Bears'

But if the play is this bad, if it needs this much cutsie business, then why are we here? The shtick's an ongoing commentary: here's what to think about this lemon. Tresnjak makes a consistent attempt (and should be praised for mounting such a difficult piece). But too often his Titus resembles a violent video game. Count me among those who suspect Shakespeare wrote the play as a blockbuster, for the groundlings, and a sendup for Hamlet's "judicious" elite. In effect, Tresnjak's staging is a send-up of a send-up. That's a double negative. It not only undercuts the play, it takes away an audience's chance to respond, be it with revulsion or schadenfreudian glee. ■

val offers local directors, actors, designers, and playwrights the chance to showcase themselves in new or rarely produced work. The actors perform on a bare stage, or with few props, against a black background. Costumes range from off the rack to off one's clothes-hanger (or floor). The emphasis is on the actor. Each evening of the festival includes three or four one-acts. Not every one will be a showstopper. Some get chosen for juicy roles rather than telling a good story or making a dramatic point. But the percentage of quality work is often high. And every now and then you find a jewel.

Worth a try.



Like writerly karma, both pieces of advice boomerang Ruth in Donald Margulies's uneven drama (about two-thirds didactic Creative Writing 1A writ large and one-third dramatic). The script has gaps, big ones. But Kandis Chappell fills them in a riveting performance. Ruth, who was most alive over 30 years ago, now faces mortality: both literary and human. Chappell's like an atlas of roads taken and not, superimposed on each other. In six scenes, spanning six years, Chappell becomes haunted by both. As Lisa, rocketed into instant stardom, Amanda Sitton's rising arc matches Ruth's tailspin. She's on her way (now shooting first and handling questions later). But - given Ruth's experience and the play's subtext about fame's imprisonment - to where? Under David Ellenstein's unfussy direction, they perform on Marty Burnett's detailed set, which looks as if Ruth hasn't changed anything

since she moved into the Greenwich Village apartment 31 years ago.

Worth a try.





Moses Hadas called it "the last Greek tragedy." But given its analysis of wars and motives and the human costs of each, Euripides' final play couldn't be more contemporary. Agamemnon, commander of the Greeks on their way to Troy, angered the goddess Artemis, who made the winds cease. She demands a sacrifice - his daughter, Iphigenia — or the thousand ships can't sail. "Some god has driven Greece mad," says Ruff Yeager's emotionally strafed Agamemnon (either that or they've placed too

Calcas, an enterprising seer). Director Douglas Lav puts the Greeks in a modern war camp (a helicopter lands so near you'll duck to avoid its blades). Along with two kids playing catch with a hand grenade, Lay's encouraged bold choices throughout, including Michelle Cabinian's innocent-as sured Iphigenia (is she Joan of Arc or the dupe of warrior-dominant rhetoric?) and a splendid performance by Robin Christ. Her Clytemnestra reveals Agamemnon's cold-blooded killer inside the loving Mycenaen queen. Chekhov this ain't, though it would like to be. (Sisters also borrows heavily from Beth Henley's "moment of happiness" in Crimes of the Heart.) Wasserstein keeps the deeper issues about anti-Semitism, non- and traditional women's roles, cultural differences on the back-burner (offstage the Soviet Union is falling apart, but you'd hardly know it). The play and Old Globe production, however, are funny throughout (including a first: during the intermission almost every character makes passionate love). Janet Zarish, Jackie Hoffman and especially Dierdre Lovejoy's Pfeni (in complete emotional sync with the best written of the three women) keep the laughs coming, as does Tom Nellis in a tour de hyper-force as Geoffrey, director of musicals, and Mark Blum as gently assertive Mervyn. Stefanie Nava makes young Tess's sudden change of plan credible (no mean feat). Alexander Dodge's elegant set's a pallette of pinks tempered by Jeff Croiter's lighting and rinsed by the music of Frank Sinatra. Worth a try.

The Self-Appointed One

For entertainment purposes, public embarrassment is not altogether a bad thing.

M. Night Shyamalan thriller, Lady in the Water, is that there is no big surprise at the end of it. It is instead a ritualistic playing-out of a

prophecy, and the only trick to it is to figure out who among the residents of The Cove apartment complex in suburban

Philadelphia (where else?) plays what part in the prophecy. We will need, first off, a Writer, a/k/a The Chosen One, who in order to fulfill his or her destiny must make eye contact with a Narf, a sea nymph from The Blue World, hiding out in our world in an underwater chamber beneath the grate at the bottom of the apartment swimming pool. The Narf, and not just any old Narf but the extra special Madame Narf, whose given name happens to be Story, is threatened on her mission by the Scrunt, a growling canine creature with grass hair, afraid of nothing but the Tartutic, three evil monkeys camouflaged in the treetops. (As Dave Barry

so often feels compelled to avow, I am not making this up.) The Scrunt, besides, can be stopped in his tracks by the gaze of a human Guardian, should such a one materialize out of the ranks

of the colorful, mostly comical apartment dwellers. In addition to a Writer and a Guardian, the Narf will

require the assistance of a Healer, a Symbolist, and a Guild, if, upon completion of her mission, she is to be successfully airlifted back to The Blue World by a giant eagle known as The Great Eatlon. It all goes according to plan, but it does not go smoothly.

This prophecy — this whole-cloth mythology — gets dribbled out to us in installments, related in her native tongue by a cranky Korean granny, who knows it as "a bedtime story" from the old country, translated into English by her ultra-modern, multiaccessoried collegiate granddaughter. The job of coaxing out the prophecy, and of casting its roles from among

the residents of The Cove, falls to the gaspingly stuttering superintendent, Cleveland Heep (Paul Giamatti), who will be asked to play the role of the Healer and, through the power of Story (i.e., power of fiction, myth, faith) to heal himself in the process, and who, when casting the rest of the roles, will run into none of the sorts


of resistance you might expect from 21st-century Philadelphians. (You say a Narf needs a Symbolist? Sign me up.) The humorless film critic in 13B, name of Farber, will prove, however, to be not the kind of writer for whom the Narf is looking, and will prove to be no help, either, with the casting of the roles, and may therefore humorously

be offered up as the sole human sacrifice to the jaws of the Scrunt. If that weren't sufficient revenge for past grievances, Shyamalan casts himself in the role of the sought-after Writer — The Chosen One — whose magnum opus, entitled *The Cookbook*, is earmarked to inspire a Great Leader who will set the misguided world back

on course. (Cue, over the closing credits, a hesitant, unconfident, but hopeful rendition of Dylan's "The Times They Are A-Changin'," by a group named A Whisper in the Noise.)

The messianic tendency has become more and more pronounced in Shyamalan's oeuvre, ever since the outsized success of The Sixth Sense gave him leave, gave him license. But it has never before achieved such a height of public embarrassment. (One can't really fault his steadfast studio, Disney, for cutting ties with the filmmaker. Well, one can: Shyamalan himself, in a tell-all book authored by Michael Bamberger, The Man Who Heard Voices: Or, How M. Night Shyamalan Risked His Career on a Fairy Tale.) For entertainment purposes, public embarrassment is not altogether a bad thing. There's a horrible sort of fascination in the spectacle, balanced by a quite pleasurable fascination in the photography of Christopher Doyle (Wong Kar-wai's right hand), the camera hovering around the faces at odd angles and with odd framings. If you're going to make a right bloody fool of yourself, you might as well make yourself a good-looking fool.

Clerks II, a sequel like any other, can make no effort to match the scruffy integrity of its 1994 forerunner, least of all an effort to match the black-andwhite photography. Not that the forerunner set any sort of mark to shoot for, but at least it accepted its limitations and worked within them. The memory of it had already been well and truly sullied, however, by repeated appearances of Jay and Silent Bob, in particular, in Kevin Smith's subsequent work, and there was no going back from the self-cannibalizing commercialism of Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back. But go back Smith defiantly, desperately does, to torch the Quick Stop and to reposition his aging, thickening clerks behind the fast-food counter at Mooby's. Onward and upward, franchisewise. And ever outward, edgewise. Only nowadays Smith is trying to stay ahead of such multiplex mainstreamers as the Farrellys and the Wayanses. He has always had clearer ideas of how to be crude (new outer boundary of taste: "interspecies erotica") than of how to be funny, and his amateurish actors (Brian O'Halloran, Jeff Anderson, Jason Mewes, Smith himself and his real-life wife, Jennifer Schwalbach) can only underscore the crudeness. Rosario Dawson, as the improbable manager at Mooby's, sticks out like a nail-polished thumb.

Lady Vengeance, or as it is called on screen, Sympathy for Lady Vengeance, rounds out the "revenge trilogy" of Chan-wook Park, which began with Sympathy for Mr. Vengeance and passed through Oldboy (no sympathy for Oldboy), although the first two arrived in American theaters in reverse order. In the final installment, independent of the others, the abstract credits sequence of creeping vine, blossoming blood, and coursing teardrop is a true grabber, and the opening scene doesn't let go: a wraithlike ex-con greeted upon her release from prison by a female chorus in Santa suits and a male choirmaster bearing the gift of a brick of tofu. (The national press, we are told, has noticed a physical resemblance between the infamous criminal and Olivia Hussey — Zeffirelli's Juliet and we can but laughingly agree.) The unwieldy flashback structure - stop, back up, proceed; stop, back up, proceed; stop, back up, proceed - and the full two-hour running time afford ample opportunity for the grip to slacken. The director, over that stretch, shows off all of his virtuosic gifts, but he also shows off his mere gimmicks, his gags, his whimsies, his frivolities, his lapses of taste. More simply, he's an inveterate showoff.

The Heart of the Game, a video documentary by Ward Serrill, chronicles the story of Bill Resler, Seattle tax man turned girls' basketball coach, and of his prize pupil, Darnellia Russell, a black transfer from her neighborhood Garfield High to white-bread Roosevelt High: "Darnellia Russell is my only chance at being famous." The story spans her entire five-year highschool career and more. It details the ups and downs of the seasons, the state tournaments, the intrasquad and intracity rivalries, the lessons learned ("Don't dribble the ball behind your back with ten seconds to go"), the coach's unconventional motivational methods (an annual theme: Pack of Wolves, Tropical Storm, Pride of Lions, etc.), and it expands into extracurriculars such as race and class, sexual molestation, teen pregnancy, courtroom drama: "To get back on the court," a TV reporter formulaically puts it, "Darnellia had to go to court."

All told, it makes a good story, and the local news announcer would seem to be guiltless of hyperbole when he calls it "one of the greatest stories in high-school basketball in the state of Washington." (A decent number of qualifiers: "one of"... "high-school"... Washington," and no need to add the qualifier of girls' basketball.) These stories happen all the time in sports, all over the place. Without the film, we would have missed this one.





The clean, sleek, toylike shapes of the vehicles (straight out of an old Chevron commercial) are easily handled, and their personalities inventively differentiated. The town itself is wittily detailed: the single flashing yellow light on Main Street, the caution-cone motel cabins, the geodesic-dome garage for the psychedelic hippie van, etc. And, outside of the herd of flatulent tractors, the sense of humor refrains from the off-color. And having to listen to Owen Wilson is much preferable to having to look at him at the same time. 

Nacho Libre — Nothing if not esoteric: a backhanded salute to Mexican wrestling movies — campy superhero adventures of masked *luchadores* with names like Santo and Blue Demon — and, more broadly, the whole south-of-the-border wrestling subculture. Odd, offbeat, outlandish as it is, it makes a fitting, albeit unforeseeable, followup to *Napoleon Dynamite* for its director, Jared Hess. The hero here is a mere wannabe, the potbellied cook in a Catholic orphanage in Oaxaca by day, and by night one-half of a hapless tag team alongside a skin-and-bones petty thief who has been filching the orphanage's donated tortilla chips. The hero's mask and mission will



take on Zorro-esque overtones when a pruriently interesting nun, immaculately acted by Ana de la Reguera, lays down the law: "These men fight for vanity, for money, for false pride." Better, a lightbulb goes on over his head, to fight for a school bus to take the orphans on "field trips and stuff." The gags and their laughs are appropriately small — e.g., the pronunciation of "nitty-gritty" with a Mexican accent, or the amorous come-on of a late-night snack of burnt toast, or the Spartan training exercises utilizing such handy resources as a cow pie and a beehive - and Hess's squared-up, flattened-out compositions are the visual equivalent of a deadpan delivery. Fat jokes and fart jokes serve, to a greater extent than desirable, to offset the esoterica. As does that John Belushi-like Joe Blow, Jack Black, working his eyebrows, nostrils, lips, etc., with all the expressiveness, the emotiveness, of a Mexican pop singer, and sporting, in addition to his robin's-egg tights with cardinal trim, a 1970s curly perm and gigolo's mustache. The whole thing might seem mildly insulting of all things Mexican, not just wrestling culture and warped English, but religion, music, food (a corncob on a stick), everything. The sympathetic (while still sardonic) portrait of Napoleon Dynamite's Latino sidekick, Pedro, surely should give the filmmaker some rope. Héctor Jiménez, Richard Montova, Peter Stormare, 2006.

Man's Chest — Sequel to PC: The Curse of the Black Pearl. And more than just a sequel: Part II of an afterthought trilogy. Johnny Depp's heavily eyeshadowed, thick-tongued pirate got to be something of a tired act before the end of the first one. And a two and-a-half-hour kiddie film goes against all traditional wisdom and common sense. And the tonnage of costumes, makeup, lighting effects, set decorations, CGI, etc., does not make it go any faster. And lastly, the up-in-the-air, to-be-continued ending is as big a cheat, as enormous an imposition, as that of The Empire Strikes Back or Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers, the time-filling middle sections of their respective trilogies. A Prairie Home Companion — Its title and its emcee have been taken from Garri-

son (a/k/a Garrulous) Keillor's weekly public-radio show. But there is no mention of the imaginary world of Lake Woebegone, MN. The sole setting is the Fitzgerald Theater in St. Paul, named after native son F. Scott, and ticketed for the wrecking ball; and the plot situation is closing night of a long-running old-fashioned live radio variety hour, mixing gospel music, cowboy songs, bluegrass, and blues: a fragile audio fantasy made heavily (and unconvincingly) concrete. Director Robert Altman brings, along with his drifting, disengaged cameras, a deep-seated condescension that makes the loss seem like no big loss. And it goes without saying that he also brings an ensemble cast: Kevin Kline as a Clouseau-esque pri-

vate eye unfortunately named Guy Noir and unfortunately narrating in first person, Virginia Madsen as a heaven-sent angel in a white trenchcoat, Tommy Lee Jones as the heartless new landlord, and a host of nonsingers as singers, Meryl Streep, Lily Tomlin, John C. Reilly, Woody Harrelson, L.Q. Jones, and the regrettably irrepressible Keillor himself. Lindsay Lohan, purportedly a professional singer, sounds the worst of the lot. (Streep, a passable warbler, always gives more than required or requested, and she alone thought to give a Minnesota accent.) Inevitably there are nice touches, like the new landlord's sour glance at the bust of Fitzgerald during Reilly's and Harrelson's "Bad Jokes" number ("Why do they

call it PMS? Because mad cow was already taken"), but Altman treats everything, good, bad, mostly indifferent, as a throwaway. 2006.

A Scanner Darkly — Druggie paranoia in the near future, when the drug du jour is Substance D (for Death) and the only cure is the torturous New-Path rehab center. Richard Linklater's adaptation of a Philip K. Dick novel avails itself of the rotoscope animation technique of his Waking Life, live-action photography covered over in a paint-by-numbers style. The undulating drawing doesn't disguise the bad performances (Keanu Reeves, Robert Downey, Jr., and Woody Harrelson, all perfectly recognizable under the paint), but it creates some noteworthy effects: the full-body "scramble suit" that conceals the wearer's identity behind a continuously shape-shifting mask; a couple of hallucinatory monsters; Winona Ryder's long-awaited first "nude" scene. 2006.

Sea of Love - A sort of heterosexual sequel to Cruising. Not an actual sequel, only a sort of. Al Pacino, the New York cop who dolled himself up in black leather and haunted the gay bars in search of a serial killer, has now taken out a matching ad in New York Weekly to ensuare another one. (Suggesting the need for, if not a new TV series, a new NYPD special unit: Date Patrol.) As in Cruising, the cop gets overinvolved personally with the respective "scene," in particular with the walking embodiment of a Ripe Tomato (Ellen Barkin, in a leather bolero of an appropriate redness). The prime point of interest in the movie, the single point that innately separates it from the faceless mob of cop stories, would clearly be the assorted pangs and perils of romance through the Classifieds. And this in truth does generate a few minutes of actual interest, although no time is spent combing through the responding mail, and we only get to meet two respondees before Barkin oozes across the table top. It will not violate any rules of criticism and give away "too much," to say that the policeman's deepening involvement with this mystery woman is not well enough developed (her seven-year-old daughter is glimpsed only once, sound asleep; her mother, the admirable Jacqueline Brookes, is allowed only two lines) for the woman to be interesting as anything other than the murderer. To say so is, however, to divulge the fatal flaw of the movie. With John Goodman; directed by Harold Becker

Strangers with Candy — Big-screen blowup of the culty Comedy Central series built around Amy Sedaris, looking uncannily like Tracey Ullman in one of her countless disguises, as a sexually ambiguous (or ambidextrous) ex-con ex-junkie who returns to high school in her late forties, afflicted with all the normal anxieties about "fitting in." A John Waters-y bad-taste treat, it mostly falls flat, but it keeps picking itself up, dusting itself off, and coming out with the odd good line: "If you're paying for cable and you're not watching TV, you're losing money. It's simple economics." With Carlo Alban, Maria Thayer, Matthew Broderick, Sarah Jessica Parker, Stephen Colbert, and Paul Dinello; directed by Dinello, 2006.

Superman Returns — A true sequel, despite the nineteen-year hiatus since the fourth and final appearance of Christopher

Reeve in the part. (The new Superman and his new Clark Kent alter ego, the littleknown Brandon Routh, not only bears a creepy physical resemblance to Reeve, but also patterns his performance on Reeve's so closely as to constitute an "impression.") The major advantage of a true sequel, namely sparing us the necessity of going back to square one, has been somewhat offset, however, by the modern mania for mythic, epic, operatic grandeur, puffing up and dragging out every little thing. We still have to sit through a flashback to Superman's childhood discovery of his powers amid the cornfields and haystacks of the Kent family farm. And there's still a wait of three-quarters of an hour until the first quick-change from dumb Clark to Super-Duper. The Lois-and-Clark business remains as absurd and as boring as ever: take away the glasses, curl a forelock, et voilà! And Kevin Spacey's incarnation of Lex Luthor, though sneerier than Gene Hackman's, is still too campy and condescending to be taken seriously, even when his apocalyptic vision of world domination is enacted on a toy-train set, or even when it's enacted on a full-scale Metropolis. Nevertheless, the special effects of an ocean-floor shockwave rippling beneath the city are well done, and not overdone, and Superman's superpowers have indisputably been enhanced by CGI: a point-blank bullet, for example, flattening itself against his Eveball of Steel. For people, whoever they may be, who might honestly have wanted another Superman movie, this is at most a serviceable one, and at the same time a most inefficient one. unprincipled hinting, shamming, and thumb-screwing to get you to believe that Cary Grant would plot the murder of his simpering bride, Joan Fontaine, 1941. ★★★ (CINEMA UNDER THE STARS, 7/27

Wassup Rockers — Larry (Kids) Clark has found his subject (kids) and isn't looking for another. This time, with a bit less of a shock factor and even more of a boredom factor, it's a tight-pantsed gang of seven Hispanic skateboarders in South Central L.A. - an Unmagnificent Seven of unexceptional skills, including their amateur improvisatory acting. There's a drive-by shooting prior to the end of the opening credits, and an aimless preamble on their home turf ("You got beer," purrs a pubescent sex kitten, "I like beer"), before they head out for a day in Beverly Hills, and a dive into the cheapest type of exploitation plotting: a traffic stop and an automobile impound, an arrest, a sexual overture from a pair of white-bread vamps ("You're not circumcised." "No, I'm Latino"), a brawl, a fatal shooting, a homosexual pedophile and a possibly fatal tumble down the stairs, a definitely fatal electrocution of a middleaged face-lifted lush. The fatal shooter, by the way, a trigger-happy Hollywood star, is unmistakably a dead ringer for Clint Eastwood ("You know my policy. Shoot first and ask questions later"), but seeing as how the real Eastwood has become the screen's Voice of Conscience, Clark's satirical aim would seem to be wide of the mark by about twenty years. Who Killed the Electric Car? — Documentarist Chris Paine investigates the automotive murder, and finds, as in Agatha Christie's Murder on the Orient Express, many bloody hands: the oil industry, the car companies, the federal government, the consumer, et al. Essentially this is in the nature of a TV news-magazine talking-head report, and it doesn't do a very good job (any more than the original advertising did) of explaining the practicalities of operating an EV (do they think every car owner in America has his own garage?). But where else are you going to see Mel Gibson and Phyllis Diller in the same movie? Martin Sheen narrates, to sharpen the liberal axe.

Hay un gran silencio aquí. Las botellas de suero, zapatos y ropa colgada sobre unas plantas llamadas Ocotillos son los restos petrificados de inmigrantes que cruzaron por esta zona. El aire es denso, la luz es tanta que ciega y el calor alcanza los 43 grados centígrados cuando apenas son las 10:30 horas.

Esta sierra desértica está considerada la segunda posición mundial más hostil a la vida humana, sólo después del Sahara; la depresión geográfica y zona serrana alcanzan en el verano hasta los 53 grados centigrados.

En los últimos cinco años han muerto 430 inmigrantes en esta área; prácticamente murieron carboni-

zados por el intenso calor. El desierto fue su trampa mortal y su tumba.

Aun así la ruta la siguen utilizando traficantes de indocumentados, conocidos como "coyotes" o "polleros". Sólo de enero a julio de este año el grupo Beta ha rescatado en la zona a 81 migrantes.

"Son zonas geográficamente muy accidentadas y es común que los 'coyotes' dejen a las personas que se fracturan o los que se les enferman en el camino". aseguró el médico José Luis Hernández, coordinador del grupo Beta Tecate, que ha rescatado este año a 341 migrantes.

Actualmente el grupo Beta de Mexicali tiene sólo seis agentes para vigilar 160 kilómetros que abarcan su jurisdicción.

"Everybody fat has her own fat story," Judith Moore wrote in Fat Girl, a statement I grieve not having the chance to debate with her. Everybody who is fat because they eat too much has the same fat story. We eat because there isn't enough love to teach us self-love and self-respect. We eat because we are empty and unfillable. Some of us say we eat because we're addicted to sugar and fats and because of our gray, hidden hearts.

The differences in fat girl stories lie in how grotesque we make ourselves and in how we travel back down the scale.

As I write the last in this series of columns, I am 130 days off sugar and flour, and I've lost, I was surprised to see, 26 pounds. Yesterday's leap of courage (and ginger step) onto the scale was necessary — reality checks are part of any food plan — but it was dangerous.


My brain is racing with numbers as I work the math of 1.44 pounds a week. By the time my sponsor comes back from China, I could lose another nine pounds. Will that be a dress size? By Thanksgiving, I could be double my loss and be floating in the world of sizes 14 to 18. Then again, I'm not often hungry for my 220-calorie "metabolic adjust-

ment" (read: snack), which could add up to another two pounds a month.

When I have to use a calculator rather than spell check, I'm wooing disaster. That future could end tonight in a deluxe crumb cake and Häagen-Dazs Swiss vanilla almond, and I wouldn't even know I was doing it until it was over.

The real reality check is not the scale or clothing sizes. It's in the way my brain works, even at this most superficial level. I can't see my own weight loss, for starters, nor do I feel 26 pounds lighter in the current heat wave. The reality is my underwear is wet and sticking to my ass, the low crotch of my shorts rubbing against my thighs, my feet swelling in what were, last week, loose shoes, so that I arrived home from my last dog walk verging on diaper rash and a blister, sweat sliding down the side of my face. The reality is looking at other pedestrians and seeing that "chubby" women coming home in their office clothes did not look like damp, badly folded origami.

Anyone 75 pounds overweight shares this story, too. What we don't share are the diets we have to put ourselves on in order to



lose weight and maintain a normal body.

The word diet is plural not because of Weight Watchers, Atkins, skinny French women, 12-step programs, or gastric bypass. Eat less + move more = weight loss. In this second, much slower descent down the scale, I've realized that the most important diet I'm on is one of the soul.

Eight years ago I timidly thought I might be pretty if I were thin, whatever "thin" or "pretty" meant. I didn't know about collarbones, great gams, or tucking a shirt in without a blazer. (For that matter, I didn't know about blazers.) I was on a physical treasure hunt, and when I got to 150 pounds, my fascination for what I'd found turned my body into an object to ponder, pander, and decorate.

In the summer of 2006, I have no questions about the body I will eventually find, but I have a lot of doubt that I can carry chronic depression on a back with clearly articulated vertebrae. As long as I live in my Original Myth of unwantableness, I will When I have to use a calculator rather than spell check, I'm wooing disaster.

relapse.

Period.

And so I pray. I give thanks for yesterday's abstinence and fireflies in the tiger lilies at dusk. I demand help ignoring said-Häagen-Dazs's limited edition sticky toffee pudding ice cream. I work on my fourth step moral inventory, tallying up my reactions to life in words like fear, envy, humiliation, and possessiveness. I repeat my mantra: I was given to my family; I am needed in this world. I deadhead petunias and pick up litter as daily good deeds. I sponsor a woman who was willing to die of her diabetes rather than give up sugar and lose weight. At six in the morning, I tell her how to be abstinent, and she shows me, in her two weeks of abstinence and new hope, why. After we hang up, I boil chickpeas for lunch, take my Wellbutrin and Zoloft, and e-mail my day's menu to my sponsor.

So if you see me leading three panting Labradors down Pineapple Street, and I'm limping in shorts that stick to my legs, remember that all fat girls share one story that you need us to witness for you.

Blessed are the obese, for we hold the pain of living in our flesh.



LEAD STORY

- The Texas insanity-defense law requires that a delusional person acting under "orders" from God be judged not guilty by reason of insanity but that a delusional person acting under "orders' from Satan be considered sane, according to prominent forensic psychiatrist Park Dietz (according to a June USA Today story). Thus, Dietz believed that Andrea Yates (at press time being retried in Houston) knew that drowning her kids upon command of someone "without moral authority" (such as Satan) was wrong and thus that she did not qualify for insanity-law protection. Dietz later concluded the opposite in another Texas childkilling case because God had supposedly assured that mother that her kids would be better off dead.

The Continuing Crisis

 Speaking to an international medical meeting in Prague in June, Israeli fertility doctor Shevach Friedler said his research team had found that women exposed to brief entertainment by clowns were successful at in-vitro fertilization at almost twice the rate of women who had no clown exposure. Friedler, who is also a trained mime, attributed the difference to greater stress reduction.

 In June, three protesters dressed in clown suits broke a lock at a supposedly secure North Dakota missile facility and attacked the top of the underground housing that holds a live Minuteman III missile by beating it with hammers and painting anti-nuclear slogans on it. They were arrested within minutes.

The Meek Win a Few

 (1) In June, British worker Mr. Sivanadian Perananthasivam was awarded three months' paid leave plus medical expenses after proving that a supervisor had used two colloquial terms for the man's posterior during an angry office exchange. (2) The Supreme Court of Canada affirmed in June that a woman divorced seven years ago is still so fragile from her husband's leaving her that she should continue to get spousal

support (in spite of Canada's no-fault divorce law). (3) Two New Jersey schoolboys separately complained recently that in yearbook sports photos, a tiny portion of their genitals can be seen up the legs of their shorts. (A Colts Neck High School student's lawsuit was dismissed in June, and a Phillipsburg High School student is pondering a lawsuit, even though a school official ordered the offending page ripped out of all books.)

Unclear on the Concept

 Joseph Weir, 23, who confessed to New York City police in May to forcibly licking the feet of as many as 70 women, said he didn't mean to hurt anyone but just wanted "to make them laugh and smile and open to talk to me.... I get on my knees, grab their feet and bow," he said (in a New York Post story). "I compliment women, I bow to them."

Can't Possibly Be True

 During his 17 months of federal incarceration in Atlanta, Wayne Milton sneaked out nights at least 50 times in order to continue the highstakes mortgage-fraud business that had landed him in jail. In May, he received a fresh, 20-year sentence for having bribed the prison guards who allowed his freedom. The smooth-talking Milton (who quoted the Bible and preyed on small-town preachers in the South) is such a relentless promoter that within days of his re-incarceration, according to an Atlanta Journal-Constitutional report, he was secretly recorded on a prison phone lining up another mortgage loan. - Inexplicable: (1) The Rhode Island Supreme Court in June affirmed a \$400,000 judgment for Charles Lennon, 68, who had sued the nowbankrupt Dacomed company after his Dura-II penile implant remained constantly erect for ten years. Lennon said embarrassment had forced him to become a recluse. (2) In Waupun, Wis., in June, a 36-year-old man filed a police complaint against a female bartender at the Alcatraz Pub because she injured him by aggressively nuzzling him to her bosom during horseplay at the bar.

Fine Points of the Law

- (1) The Michigan Supreme Court ruled in June that a marijuana user need not be intoxicated to violate the state's "operating [a vehicle] under the influence" law if the prosecutor can prove that the psychoactive ingredient THC was still in his system. (2) A federal judge in Albany, N.Y., dismissed a state prisoner's lawsuit that claimed that housing two inmates in a cell designed for one was cruel and unusual punishment. The judge rejected the petitioner's toilet-smell argument by using the Pythagorean Theorem to show that the odorwafting-distance difference was minimal.

People Different From Us

• (1) Enrique Mora of Montclair, Calif., said that within a few days of his gold detector's having sounded in his front yard, he had dug a hole six stories down (but had come up empty). He said he had only planned to dig three or four feet, but got "carried away," according to a June Associated Press report. (2) Martinsburg, W.Va., physician John C. Veltman, 52, was arrested in May after he commandeered a backhoe and hit a building and a tree and crashed through two fences. Veltman allegedly told an arriving police officer, "I am a [expletive omitted by the Martinsburg Journal) medical doctor, and you are below me.

Least Competent People

A 25-year-old American from Boston, in Hanover, Germany, for World Cup matches, was forced to report to police that he had no idea which hotel he had checked into or where it was. According to a Reuters report, the man, reportedly sober, remembered being driven past a park and a Mercedes dealership, but since there are several of those in Hanover, police had to drive him around town for an hour until he recognized the building.

Update

- In December, "News of the Weird" reported on a Welsh inventor's sound device called the Mosquito, which takes advantage of young people's greater audio range and emits a sound annoying to them but which most adults do not notice. The inventor used it to drive young hoodlums from their hangouts without disturbing adults. Recently, the inventor, Howard Stapleton, introduced a youth-friendly spinoff: a cell phone ringtone that is audible to most young people but not noticeable to most adults (who might prefer ringtone silence).

Chutzpah!

- (1) The Nigerian government recently began to warn its citizens traveling to Europe that those countries are full of scam artists. (The travel advisory mentioned pickpocket schemes, but apparently European e-mail scams are less of a problem.) (2) General Motors executives, trying to explain the dwindling stock-market value of the company, have repeatedly complained of pension benefits owed under United Auto Workers contracts; however, according to a June Wall Street Journal investigation, GM's fund for worker pensions is "overstuffed with cash," while its fund for executive pensions is \$1.4 billion in the red and getting worse.

(1) A 23-year-old woman and her 27-yearold companion were accidentally run over and killed while standing in a far left lane of Interstate 10, arguing (Ocean Springs, Miss., June). (2) A 46-year-old man, breaking through a bedroom window in the home of his estranged wife in violation of a restraining order, accidentally slashed an artery and bled to death (Milwaukee, June). (3) A 51-year-old man, trying to drive around a traffic jam on Interstate 10 as he was fleeing a gas station where he had just pumped \$60 worth of gas without paying, fatally struck another car (with only minor injuries to the other driver) (Welsh, La., June).





Dear Saffron,

I'm confused about the mail-in rebate system. I'm a new immigrant. I've learned a lot of things during the two years since I came here: Christmas presents should not be opened until the morning of Christmas Day; a cell phone is free, but you must pay every month even if you do not use it; Sunday newspapers have the coupons...but I can't figure out how mail-in rebates work. I followed all instructions, cut out the bar code, and mailed in the required form with the receipt in March. I did the same thing in April. I have gotten no response. How long is this supposed to take? It's just a small amount of money, but I want to know if I should trust rebates or avoid the next mailin rebate sale.

NEWCOMER IN MISSION VALLEY

Dear Newcomer,

You sound like a clever person who's figuring

out the trickier parts of American culture. If you purchase something that has a mail-in rebate, keep a photocopy of all paperwork, and make a note of when you sent it in. If you haven't received payment within 90 days, contact the company. Personally, I have sworn off mail-in rebates because I only got the reimbursement about half of the time — even though, like you, I carefully followed directions. I am happier finding straight-up good prices on items I need and living rebate-free. Any readers have rebate tales they want to share?

Dear Readers,

I got a ton of mail re: the letter about alleged harassment of seals at Casa Beach in La Jolla (a.k.a. Children's Pool Beach). Here are three of the responses:

Dear Saffron,

The letter you printed about the seals at Children's Pool contained many inaccuracies put forward by a slick set of promoters who make their living off contributions solicited from animal lovers with claims of seal torture and the destruction of helpless animals. One of the lies in that letter is that "Children's Pool is the only rookery in California." No, it is one of two — the other is in Carpinteria [12 miles south of Santa Barbara]. A rookery is anywhere seals choose to breed — that is, anywhere they choose to haul themselves out of the water for this purpose. An estimate by the National Oceanic

and Atmospheric Administration's Northwest Fisheries Science Center states there are 860 of these documented "haul-out" sites in California...the population of harbor seals in California increased ten times from 1970 to 2005, so obviously they are not having problems breeding. Another lie in the letter is about what's legal. The Marine Mammal Protection Act defines "harassment" as deliberate, with specific exceptions for city-level employees to use nonlethal means to remove "nuisance pinnipeds." Sea lions destroyed Pier 39 in San Francisco, as nobody could stop them. Another lie is that "The city wants to illegally dredge the beach in hopes of scaring the seals off." The court ordered the waterflow restored to 1941 condition, as the city had violated the trust by which it accepted title to that land and seawall. The city is appealing and filing delays, as it does against any expense.

Much as I like animals, and cute as they are, it'd be nice if the beach got flushed and kids could swim there again. BIRDLAND AND THE BANANA BELT

I worked for 16 hours at San Francisco General Hospital yesterday. The final 8 hours was spent on 6B, where I worked with Trent. Trent is an erstwhile Marinite-turnedrealtor who tells me all kinds of stuff about Marin, the county I've lived in for 30 years. He is trying to get "vested" so as to sweeten his retirement while one can still do that working for the City. I also worked with Carlos, with whom I had a few good laughs about Evo Morales, president of Bolivia, and Alejandro Toledo, president of Peru (Carlos is Peruvian). I tell him I think Toledo is handsome, that he reminds me of an Inca warrior and I'd have him for my new boyfriend instead of Hugo Chavez of Venezuela, who Carlos thinks is a communist.

I listen to JB, a patient I know well, sing at the top of his lungs all night long — "Old King Cole was a merry old soul and a merry old soul was he." JB is a black man who everyone is afraid of because of the verbal abuse and the obscenities he spews when he's off his meds, which is often. What they fail to remember, if they know him at all, is that he has never laid a hand on anybody and is a kind soul, alternately calling me a bitch because I know his case manager, "who had me arrested for nothin," then hugging me and asking me about my son. JB has a grown son in Iraq.

Trent tells me about "birdland," a section in the flatter

part of Mill Valley where the streets are all named after birds. If you live there you are pitied at cocktail parties because it's lower class (although the median price for houses is seven figures).

Trent said that he has gone to cocktail parties where people who live in "the banana belt," a small portion of Sausalito on the water, brag about the microclimate they live in, which they claim is much better than in the hills. Real estate prices in the hills, however, are so obscene that one cannot do anything but drive by.

The glitterati of Marin have it all balkanized into tax brackets and resale value.

In all my years in Marin, I had never heard these neighborhood tags.

Trent hates Marin and thinks all the people who were born and raised here have serious psychological problems, a sense of entitlement from being raised

around money, whether one has money or not. I think he's right, and it makes me wish I had gotten out of here long ago, when Bette did, taking her son to the wine country to be raised among the lowerincome folks there who have nothing to do with grapes or wine.

Trent knows nothing of Lucienne O'Keefe, who

is anything but entitled. O'Keefe is an activist of the highest order, with a rap sheet a mile long for civil disobedience. She's in her 70s and is an ex-nun who has lived here at least as long as I have. She has

dedicated her retirement from the Longshoreman's Union to full-time activism.

Or of Norm "The Red" Gover, or Duncan Draper, or Kathy Rolston, who all more or less do the same.


