



Helen Copley's legacy In 2003 and 2004, as **Helen Copley** lay gravely ill, Copley Press

hired the Washington, D.C., firm of Capitol Tax Partners to lobby for lower estate taxes. According to U.S. Senate disclosure records, the newspaper chain paid a total of \$280,000 for the services of **Jonathan Talisman**, a well-connected Washington tax hand. Talisman had worked for Demo-

cratic senator **Daniel Patrick Moynihan** of New York as chief counsel for the Senate Finance Committee minority staff before becoming assistant secretary for tax policy at the Department of the Treasury under President **Bill Clinton**. Since joining the ranks of Capitol Hill lobbyists, his clients have included General Electric and big life insurance companies.

But whatever tax breaks Talisman arranged for Copley, they apparently weren't enough to save the newspaper chain after its owner's demise. Last week Copley Press said that because of newspaper-industry weakness and debt incurred for estate taxes from Helen Copley's death in August 2004, the company was exploring the sale of all its news-

papers except the *Union-Tribune*. "That's corporate speak for 'You're for sale,' " the publisher of the *Peoria Journal Star* told his shocked employees. The Illinois papers in

Springfield, Lincoln, Gales-

burg, and Peoria and the Ohio papers in Canton, Massillon, and Dover/New Philadelphia expect to be jettisoned by spring. Copley is already negotiating to sell its Torrance-based papers.

Ironically, the financially conservative Helen Copley was averse to debt. She was influenced by two bedrock Iowans on the company board: her brother **Joe Kinney** and lawyer **David MacDuff Elderkin**. But as Helen Copley became ill in the mid-1990s, management took on debt to pay \$175 million for the Peoria and Galesburg papers. After dumping some Chicago-area money losers, the company then snapped up the Ohio properties beginning in 2000.

On the cocktail circuit, some say that cash flow from the acquisitions has paid off most of that debt. The privately held company isn't talking. A more skeptical view is that Helen Copley's debt aversion

was right on the mark: even if these papers threw off cash, their long-term prospects were never so hot. Canton, for example, had a population of 116,000 in 1950. It's now below 80,000 and falling. Peoria's population was 124,160 in 1980; now it's down to 112,936. The surrounding metro areas have

done better, but these are not growth markets.

So will Copley get a decent price for these properties? Daily newspaper valuations are plunging. Ailing newspaper chains aren't buying now. Private equity groups are showing interest in papers. "They [Copley] should come out ahead,

but when you take account of inflation, the cost of money, what they may have invested, it may be a wash," says **Larry Grimes**, newspaper broker in the Washington, D.C., area. Chicago's Tribune Company is considering liquidation and looking for buyers, "but I am hearing that the deals offered the Tribune are not attractive. And the private equity guys are only interested in a particular [low] price."

U-T employees are nervous. The Copley Press staff in La Jolla won't be needed, and its building is choice real estate. Copley News Service will die, shrink, or be folded into the U-T. The company offered buyouts to employees with more than 30 years of service. On October 30, the Audit Bureau of Circulations reported that U-T circulation continues to drop: for the year ended September 30, Sunday circulation dropped from 416,682 to 390,310 and Monday-Friday from 314,279 to 304,334. The company continues to inflate its numbers with "other paid" circulation (mainly those papers that get dumped in your driveway even though you are not a subscriber). They were 30,352 Sunday and 20,787 Monday-Friday. Readers, however, stay misinformed. On September 12, the U-Treported that it had "a circulation of about 340,000 daily and 440,000 Sunday." At that time its own house organ was saying that daily circulation was 305,000 and Sunday 380,000.

Chief executive **David Copley**, Helen's heir, has had a heart transplant. On June 22, 2006, **Harold W. Fuson Jr.**, the company chief counsel, appeared at the United States Embassy in Beirut as part of its "Conference in Support of an Independent Media," which Ambassador Jeffrey Feltman described as "a useful and productive exchange between

media leaders about successful business models for print, internet, radio and television outlets in Lebanon."

Fuson's snazzy PowerPoint presentation, featuring photos of his granddaughter, asked the questions, "Will journalists become a charitable institution? Will employees take con-

trol?" There has been talk that when David dies, the newspaper will be run by a charitable nonprofit institution, rather than be sold. Contacted last week, Fuson declined comment.

There is a precedent for that in Florida's *St. Petersburg Times*, bequeathed in 1978 by **Nelson Poynter** to the nonprofit media institute bearing his name. "But that's in cases in which the owners want to have a great paper and care for the staff," scoffs a veteran *U-T* employee. "But Copley has never wanted a great paper and doesn't care that much for the staff."

There are at least two good reasons to expect a sale: top brass have been given generous golden parachutes, according to a reliable source, and chief operating officer **Charles (Chuck) Patrick** has a home in Santa Barbara that he is now refurbishing.

This Dog Was Fixed

management has been screwing the pooch. Since 2000, it has piled up Petco will be purchased by

debt so insiders could make fat and fast bucks. Because it has concentrated on financial finagling, not its business, it has fallen far behind its Phoenix competi-

Petco will be purchased by two groups of investors, Leonard Green and Partners and Texas Pacific Group, that pulled the same stunt six years ago, amassing 600 percent profits as they dumped their

Now you have to wonder if Petco's share-holders have the intelligence with borrowed money in 2000.

holders have the intelligence of a cur — or a flea. Late last month, these stockholders overwhelmingly approved a debt-financed buyout at a price well below another bid. with borrowed money in 2000, they took it public again in 2002. By late 2004, Green/Texas Pacific had jettisoned all their shares, which they had given themselves for only 49 cents each. Green/Texas Pacific will certainly flip Petco again: they will sell the company if anyone is dense enough to buy it, or they will bring it out in still another public offering.

This process is called a leveraged buyout, and it makes no economic sense other than to enrich a group of piranhas. All over the country, leveraged buyouts are picking up steam, and some observers, notably the New York Times, are concerned. In a leveraged buyout, financial sharks buy a company with as much as 90 percent debt, usually junk bonds. Often, the buyers pay themselves a succulent dividend. The company goes private for a short time, then goes public again, and the insiders, who have put little of their own money in the deal, get rich quick as they dump their stock.

That's what's been happening at Petco. In 2000, the two buyout groups, Leonard Green and Partners and Texas Pacific Group, bought the company for \$600 million, only \$190 million of which was their own money. The rest was debt. The company went private and then went public again in 2002, and although it was stumbling from the debt load, the stock soared, and the buyout group dumped its shares for \$1.2 bil-

The Right of Way Is the Wrong Place

very election season, my father sinks a wire-framed campaign sign into the strip of grass between his sidewalk and the street.

Every election season, an unseen enemy steals it. Dad replaces the sign. The enemy removes it sometime in the night. Dad nails the sign to the cedar tree growing in the grass strip. It's gone the next morning. Dad vows to stay up all

night hiding in the bushes to catch the enemy in the act, but the cold autumn night dissuades him from his plan. He has a few suspicions as to the enemy's identity. They're centered around a Green Party member a few doors down.

Early October in La Mesa: I stuck four campaign signs in front of my house on a busy street that feeds and receives traffic from a freeway a quarter mile away. Like Dad, I drove the signs' wire frames into the strip between the street and the sidewalk. Like Dad's, my signs were nabbed in the night.

While stealing political signs has gone on as long as there have been political signs, Dad, Hildegard, and I may not be victims of thieves. Municipal employees may have taken our signs. That's because all three of us placed our signs in the public right-of-way, a practice prohibited by most cities in the county.

"You have to study the city rules — and sign regulations are almost always city law — carefully," said Randal Morrison, a San Diego attorney who specializes in sign law. "Because the rules often vary according to whether the property is owned by the City or privately owned."

I called the City of La Mesa to find out if I'd violated the rules with my signs. "Did you put them between the sidewalk and the street?" asked a La Mesa planning department official named Allyson Kinnard.

"Yes," I answered.

"That is a prohibited location. You're not allowed to put signs in the right-of-way. The sidewalk and the land between it and the street are city property. As far as what happened to the signs, public works does in some cases take signs out of the right-of-way."

Allyson referred me to the

City's website for codes governing political yard signs, then transferred me to code enforcement officer Alan Edwards. "I did not pull those signs," he told me, "but city workers are allowed to pull signs that are in the right-ofway. They could be over at public works."

According to La Mesa's municipal code, "temporary noncommercial" signs such as political yard signs can be 32 square feet. That's the size of a 4-by-8-foot sheet of plywood. They can't be illuminated, and they must be on private property, set back at least one foot from the property line. My La Mesa street has a sidewalk that delineates where my property stops and city property begins. But most residential streets in La Mesa don't have sidewalks, which makes knowing the exact boundary difficult. That's why, Edwards said, "If I find something that is sort of in the gray area as to whether it's on the right-of-way or on someone's property, then I leave it. I try to stay away from any entanglements or being accused of picking and choosing which signs I take."

Like La Mesa, most cities in the county forbid placement of political signs in the public right-of-way. Exceptions are Poway and Santee. "They can be in the right-of-way," said Tommy, a planning

department official for the City of Poway, "but not in the medians. And they can't be attached to fences or light posts or anything like that. They have to be sunk in the ground."

On a list of "frequently asked questions about election signs" e-mailed to me by Janet Peterson of the City of Santee, question number five, "May I install election signs in the public right-ofway?" is answered, "Yes, except

within road medians." An answer later on the list states that signs in the right-of-way "are not subject to city permits. However, signs placed in such a manner so as to obstruct pedestrian, bicyclist, or driver views...must be removed."

La Mesa code dictates that political signs may be erected no sooner than 45 days before an election and must be taken down no later than 5 days after. That's one of the longer time frames allowed in the county. Escondido, for example, allows signs 30 days before and 10 days after an election. San Marcos allows 32 days before and 10 days after. National City allows 30 before and 5 after. The City of Del Mar takes the approach of allowing 60 days' display of campaign signs in any calendar year. Morrison said these cities are treading upon the First Amendment by placing time limits on political signage. "The most common legal problem with the rules on political signs," he explained, "is the cities usu- & ally state that you can only \(\subseteq \). display them X number of ® days before the election and § X number of days after. When someone cares enough to \$\frac{7}{9}\$ challenge those rules, the judges almost always invalidate [the rules]. The reason is, people have political opin-

cessfully attempted to thwart the recent buyout. Having failed that, it now seeks to get damages of \$200 million, according to Darren J. Robbins of Lerach Couglin Stoia Geller Rudman and Robbins.

Petco's shareholders last

month went for a \$29 offer from this buyout group because the price was 49 percent higher than the stock was selling for when the deal was suddenly announced in mid-July. That's a juicy premium. However, there was a much juicier \$33a-share offer from PetSmart on the table.

Management walked away from that higher offer, claiming that antitrust considerations would delay or perhaps abort the merger. Ah, but PetSmart offered Petco shareholders \$3.50 a share if the deal didn't go through. And it was doubtful that the antitrust lads would have blocked this one anyway: together, Petco and PetSmart have about \$5.7 billion of the pet supplies industry, estimated to be running near \$39 billion annually. That's around 15 percent.

With the \$33 offer and a \$3.50 consolation bonus, the PetSmart deal was a "winwin" for Petco shareholders, says Robbins. Petco shareholders preferred to lose-lose, apparently not fully cognizant that Leonard Green and Texas Pacific have been using the company as a "personal piggybank," says Robbins, and will do so again in the next flip, probably two years hence.

Petco kept its shareholders in the dark about its pending plans. On July 14, 2006, it suddenly announced that it would be bought by Green and Texas Pacific for cash. The news release did not mention that Green/Texas Pacific had bought the company before. In addition, the release said a special committee of the board had studied "an expression of interest" by a buyer. That was stated in the singular. But on August 11, the shareholders learned in a special proxy that PetSmart in April had offered a \$30 to \$32 buyout. So that July 14 news release was wrong; there had been two expressions of interest. Shareholders also learned in August that Green/Texas Pacific had made the first bid on March 25 at \$26.50 a share. After the Pet-Smart bid of April, the two parties engaged in a bidding battle (usually called a pissing contest), in which each alternately boosted its offer.

Another thing revealed in that August 11 confessional was that before Green and Texas Pacific made the March 25 bid, their partners already had snapped up 3.2 percent of Petco stock. This means that after those partners dumped the last bit of their shares in October 2004 at above \$35, they waited while Petco stock plummeted and began snatching up shares again at lower prices. Nice timing for a group that had controlled the company only a few years earlier.

Back in March, Petco management concluded that the initial offer looked good, because investors were skeptical about management's embarrassingly consistent missing of earnings targets. And among other things, Wall Street questioned the company's long-term pricing strategy in its stores. For some time, Petco had been pricing goods too high; that's one thing that motivated big-

box retailers like Wal-Mart and Target to put more oomph behind the pet supplies business. Those two, along with grocery stores, were devouring Petco. That's a major reason why Petco shares were almost cut in half after the buyout group sold the last of its stock at \$35.60 in October 2004.

In April, May, and June, Petco weighed the offers as they hopscotched upward. The company said it pondered the antitrust question — a contrived defense against PetSmart. On July 13, the buyout group jumped its bid to \$29. That would be \$1.8 billion, of which \$1.35 billion would be burdensome debt. The next day, Petco announced that it would accept it — with shareholders unaware of the \$33 bid on the table.

Petco's strategy of not revealing the bidding war was *not* in the spirit of full and timely disclosure. If the bidding battle had become news earlier, some other potential buyers might have surfaced. Shareholders might have received a better deal. The suit alleges that the Petco board and its financial backers violated their fiduciary duties by failing to engage in a process that would

maximize shareholder value.

But was Petco brass worried about its shareholders? Ha! If it had cared about them, would it have snubbed the much higher bid? As the lawsuit states, a major reason for Petco's taking the lower bid is that PetSmart refused to say that Petco management, particularly chairman Brian K. Devine and chief executive James M. Myers, would keep their jobs after the acquisition.

And why would PetSmart want to keep Petco's top management? PetSmart's recent earnings have been growing steadily, both quarterly and yearly. That can't be said for Petco. Long-term debt is just 27.2 percent of PetSmart's total capitalization. It's 38.4 percent of Petco's. PetSmart's sales are running at \$3.6 billion a year. Petco's are \$2.1 billion. Standard and Poor's says PetSmart's sales will grow 12 to 13 percent this year. Petco's

will go up 10 percent.

Yet, under the Green/Texas Pacific buyout, Devine can continue on for three years at current remuneration levels. In 2004, he raked in more than \$4 million, and that pay level continues, according to the suit. After his employment terminates, he will begin a 20year consulting contract that will pay him 25 percent of his last year's salary for the first 10 years, and 50 percent of that final year's pay for the last 10 years. He is 64 years old. Seventeen Petco directors and executives get cash payments of a collective \$16.6 million.

Sweet, huh? That's why Robbins calls it a sweetheart deal — self-dealing, breach of fiduciary duty, unjust enrichment at the expense of the shareholders. That's putting it mildly. Requests for comment to three separate Petco officials went unanswered.

ions all the time, not just during election seasons. And if they want to express their political opinions before the election, they can."

The City of Santee observes the First Amendment when it comes to campaign signage. Though it places 30-day pre- and 10-day postelection time limits on signs in the right-of-way, Santee's answer to the question "Am I required to remove my election signs on my residential property within a certain time following the election?" is, "No, such signs are constitutionally protected."

"Another very common mistake cities make," said Morrison, "is having special rules that apply only to political signs. For instance, they'll put a size limit on the political signs, and then if you look elsewhere in the local law, they will allow temporary construction signs or store signs to be larger. That means the city is giving greater display rights to a commercial message than to a noncommercial message. In the law, the word 'noncommercial' means debate on topics of public concern, the very thing the First Amendment was written to protect. Constitutionally, you simply cannot favor commercial messages over noncommercial, period."

CITY LIGHTS

Constitutional concerns may be the reason the City of Imperial Beach, other than forbidding signs in the public right-of-way, places "no real restrictions" on political signs, according to a city planning official. "It's just a matter of whether it becomes a design problem or a traffic hazard or if we start getting complaints about it."

Thirty-two square feet is the largest political sign allowed by most cities in the county. On private property, Vista allows only 16-square-foot signs. Like Poway and Santee, Vista allows signs in the public right-of-way, but while those two cities allow 32-square-foot signs in the right-of-way, in Vista the maximum is 6 square feet.

As for my four campaign signs, nobody I reached at the City of La Mesa planning, code enforcement, or public works departments knew anything about them. Like Dad, I began to think a political enemy had taken them. Like Dad, I formulated strategies to catch the enemy as I placed new signs out front, this time not in the right-of-way. Like Dad, I didn't employ any of the clever ideas I came up with. Unlike Dad's signs, my legally located signs stayed up all election season. In fact, they're still up. And, unless I insist on my First Amendment rights, I've got three days to remove them.





STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP

Hey Matt:

Why does it seem that my left nostril churns out more products (boogers) than my right? I know that people can be left or right handed, and some people are right-/left-eye dominant. Is it possible that I am left-nostril dominant? I have canceled out the obvious factors such as tides, full moons, and the ratio of items scratched to items sniffed. By the way, I am not proud of it, but I am a mouth breather.

Nostrils are a little like Siamese twins. Stuck together, looking a lot alike, but surprisingly independent under the right circumstances. And that includes booger management. You get the little squashy things by breathing in dust that catches in your nose hairs and mucus, and by your sinuses draining through the back door and into your nasal passages. Eventually it goes away, but you know your right side was plugged up. Weird. Next night same thing, only it's your left nostril this time. Weirder. What's going on is called the nasal cycle. Most people (though not all) experience it. Seems each nostril is fed by its own bloodvessel branch. For reasons the science guys haven't really pinned down, blood flows alternately on the right side, then the left in cycles of one to three hours. So, periodically, 24/7, each nostril is engorged with blood and nasal passages narrow.

Seems like a pretty goofy bit of physiology. But of course there is nothing about the human body that is too goofy to be investigated in some lab. And darned if some lab didn't come up with at least a good guess. They speculate that the alternate blood rush acts like a pump that squeezes a specific kind of infection-fighting plasma exudates into the nasal passages to help fight germs we suck in. This is still in the realm of nasal speculation, of course, but no dumber than the phenomenon itself.

I got to do something to postpone my least favorite chore: mowing the damn lawn. And weeding, trimming, watering. And everything else that has to do with all that miserable vegetation around my house. So I'm writing to you. Who is the jerk who invented lawns? If I put in Astroturf or green cement, I know the neighbors would have me arrested. What's wrong with weeds anyway?

Not a thing wrong with weeds, R.B. It's an old Grandma Alice adage that a weed is just a flower in the wrong place. If it makes you happy, grab a beer, sit back, and watch the turf die. Soon enough you'll have a low-maintenance dirt yard with a nice stand of weeds. Ignore those neighbors when they threaten you. Ignore the residents' committee when they declare that the only acceptable homeowners are those who are lawn lovers. They're just status-seeking conformists with no sense of independence or imagination and a deadly fear of their home prices being depressed by your bad attitude. In fact, they sound like just the kind of people who had something to do with how lawns became the tyrannical things they are.

Lush green lawns were originally an obsession with the English upper classes in the 18th Century, but wild grasses have been part of the domestic garden scene since the days of ancient Greece. For the most part, grasses were used as background elements for gardens, not things to be admired on their own until the English nobility decided it liked lawn bowling. The game requires a very neat and carefully groomed grass court, and this seems to be when things took their insidious turn and a tidy lawn became the hallmark of class. It also indicated that the homeowner didn't have to plant his lawn to survive; he could live very nicely off others' labors. The British, of course, in the 18th and 19th Centuries had two things we Californians don't have much of: rain and servants. The duke, unlike you and me, didn't have to postpone his fun to go out and mow the estate.

Middle-class American homes in the 18th and 19th Centuries generally didn't have lawns. They were built close to the road and were surrounded by trees, veg gardens, wild grasses, and livestock. Late in the 19th Century, though, new homes were set back from the road, and a lawn filled in the gap for every right-thinking, status-seeking American. Around 1920 somebody developed a weed-free grass seed, then somebody else invented the gas-powered lawn mower, and our fate was sealed, even though a green grass lawn in California is just a big water waster.

Apparently, I'm not the only one who has noticed, shall we say, a lack of content to the position. The NFL Network, starting its first season broadcasting company games on November 23, won't employ a sideline reporter. CBS eliminated the position before the season started. No one noticed.

No woman has ever called play-by-play in the NFL. Of the megathousand Division I college-football games played every year, I've found only one woman, Pam Ward, who does play-by-play (Big Ten football on ESPN).

To be honest, we can't use the "Never played the game" argument against women. Howard Cosell, no matter what you think of him, was the premier sportscaster of his day. Al Michaels is the gold standard today. Neither man played football.

Regard Lesley Visser, 52, who has been a sideline reporter for *Monday Night Football*, CBS, and ESPN. Saying that, I couldn't pick Visser out from a police lineup of Century 21 Real Estate agents, which tells you something about the impact of sideline reporters.

Visser began working for the *Boston Globe* in 1974, became the first female NFL beat writer. That's impressive; that had to be hard. That's the whole world against you and you sticking it out. Plus, there's no way you can be a beat reporter and not know the game.

Visser has been given the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Pete Rozelle Radio-Television Award, which, unfortunately, sounds like a make-work award. She's worked NCAA Final Fours, Super Bowls, World Series, U.S. Open, Olympics, NBA, and everything else, usually as the first woman.

In fact, if you look at Visser's job as sideline reporter from another angle, you could say she was underemployed. Maybe it's the nature of being a sideline reporter that makes anyone doing it look stupid. Maybe the NFL should try putting a woman in the booth.



It wasn't so much the 22 candles being lit for the High Mass celebrating All Saints' Day at All Saints' Episcopal

Church; it was the guys lighting them: two strapping young Polynesians in floor-length black cassocks. Later, they showed up bearing candles, white albs over their cassocks, processing behind an equally imposing young man whipping his smoking thurible in great, controlled arcs that rose above his head before he yanked the brazen vessel back toward the floor. The three were preceded by two bagpipers and a drum and followed by a banner-bearer, the verger, the choir (also in cassocks and albs), the subdeacon and deacon, guest preacher Archdeacon David Lowman, and, finally, the rector, Father Tony Noble, draped in an embroidered gold cloak highlighted by a midnightblue mantle bearing the image of Mary and the infant Jesus.

Noble ascended the steps at the front of

the church, past the choir stalls; ascended again into the sanctuary, past the communion rail; ascended a third time to the altar set against the front wall. He turned and greeted the congregation and then joined in a second procession (minus the pipers and the choir) around the church, while everybody sang over the lively organ: "For all the saints, who from their labors rest..." When he returned to the Sanctuary - stopping at the communion rail to doff the cloak and mantle and don a gold chausible — he censed the altar, genuflecting frequently before the domed tabernacle. The attending deacon and subdeacon did the same.

References to the saints permeated the Mass. "My dear brothers and sisters," said Noble at the outset, "we come to rejoice today in our communion with the saints in heaven. We give thanks for their examples and their prayers." After Kyrie and the Gloria (both sung, like much of the Mass), the Collect invoked the grace of God, "who has knit together thy elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of Thy Son," so that "we may come to know the ineffable joys" of heaven.

The saints were in the songs, both those sung by the congregation and those performed by the choir: "These are they which came out of great tribulation/ and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." And at one point, Noble asked the Sunday-school children to come forward bearing saints' statues, show them to the congregation, and say something about them. Up they came: Thomas, Therese, Peter, Paul, Anthony of Padua... A little girl bore a white porcelain statue of Mary about half as big as she was. "The angel told her she was going to have a baby." "And who was the baby?" asked Noble. "Jesus."

Archdeacon Lowman began his sermon by quoting the demons in Cardinal Newman's poem "The Dream of Gerontius," set to music by Edward Elgar. "What's a saint? A bundle of bones which fools adore when life is o'er ha ha.... Though I know the piece quite well,

this passage always shocks me. It raises big questions. What's a saint? Well, I've seen various bits of Saint Claire, Saint Francis, Saint Peter. I've seen the heart of Saint Teresa of Avila and her left forearm." Lowman knew from bones. But, he said, "Let's go back to the Scriptures, first of all to Isaiah. There he is in the temple, when he suddenly sees the Lord God in glory. And he cries out, Woe is me, for I am undone; I am a man of unclean lips.' He's seen the glory and the holiness of God, and he's changed forever.... A bundle of bones which fools adore when life is o'er? No. It is the living Body of Christ, touched by the vision of holiness we have seen in Iesus Christ and received in His gospel teaching." And as a model for saintly sanctity, he offered the Beatitudes listed in the Gospel, reading, "rev-

olutionary words which

have turned the world and its values upside-

Before the final prayers, Noble invited the congregation to return that evening "for evensong and Benediction. We only do this once a year, and today's the day." He noted the new tabernacle and new monstrance, both blessed earlier that morning, and invited the congregation to come up and admire them after Mass. "By tradition, the tabernacle is covered...to symbolize the presence of Christ in the sacrament.... I deliberately left it off this morning." Then he said, "What a day to honor Mary as the queen of all saints. Let's stand and say the Angelus." All rose and turned to face a statue of the Virgin. "The angel of the Lord brought the tidings to Mary. And she conceived by the Holy Ghost. Hail Mary, full of grace...

What happens when we die?

"I hope that I shall go to heaven," says Lowman.

•• Ch, and pumpkin pie is out. This year, I want chocolate. Nothing but chocolate." Uncle Max is at it again, ruffling feathers throughout the Kelly family chicken coop. He does love to see the older women grumble about broken traditions, but rich old Max is flying everyone in for Thanksgiving dinner, and he who pays the piper.... They squawked when he lined up a slew of stuffed squab — as far

from the usual monster turkey as you can get while still eating birds. They complained about stirring massive batches of risotto instead of letting the electric mixer take care of the mashed potatoes. And asparagus with hollandaise instead of yams?

"Why don't we just move to France and be done with it?" asked Aunt Grace. But it's Grandma who's really put out. Every year, she makes the pumpkin pie; it's her signature at the end of the masterpiece that is the Kelly Thanksgiving.

Hot Chocolate

Max is smart, I'll give him that. He came to me, because I'm Grandma's favorite. "She won't get mad at you," he surmised. "So I want you to run the hot chocolate bar. Find as many varieties of primo hot chocolate as you can. Be able to talk a little about each, and make sure I get plenty of your personal favorite." So I set off to the shops. Call me a peacemaker.

My friends Mary Ann and Cherie joined husband Patrick and me for the preliminary taste test. First up, Trader Joe's Organic Cocoa powder (\$4.99 for eight ounces), which proclaimed itself fit for either baking or drinking. The recipe called for equal parts of sugar and cocoa to be added to the milk. No one thought the result should be added to Thanksgiving. Cherie nosed out the biggest flaw: "It's got a sour nose and a sour taste." "There's no marriage of flavors," complained Mary Ann. "It tastes like cocoa powder and milk." But the next offering soothed both palate and conscience: the Trader Joe's Conacado Organic Fair Trade Cocoa (\$3.99 for 12 ounces). The cocoa is purchased from a growers' cooperative in the Dominican Republic, which ensures a good wage for the farmers. "I don't generally like too much ethics in my diet," said Patrick, "but this is

good. A solid, bitter cocoa bite, and they didn't try to drown it with

westward for a Mexican spiced cocoa from Mocafe-Azteca D'Oro (\$3.99 for 14 ounces at Whole Foods). All agreed that "spiced" was the main event here. "Overwhelming cinnamon," judged Patrick." "Cardamom," added Cherie. "The chocoholic needs more chocolate taste," quipped Mary Ann.

I steamed another pan of milk and opened the gold retro can of Scharffen Berger's (\$6.49 for eight ounces at Whole Foods). "The can's so stylish," admired Mary Ann. Patrick and I agreed that the flavor was bittersweet, sophisticated, and powerful. But we yearned for a little more body, a slightly thicker texture. That's what we got from the Schokinag European Drinking Chocolate (\$8.99 for 12 ounces at Whole Foods). "This

is perfect in every way," hummed Cherie. "It's like I'm drinking chocolate shavings. It smells

like I'm drinking chocolate shavings. It smells like pure chocolate." I liked the way it coated the insides of my cheeks and left a rich, earthy finish on my tongue.

Mary Ann preferred the Ghirardelli Premium Het Coco. (\$4.49 for 16 ourses at Whele

Mary Ann preferred the Ghirardelli Premium Hot Cocoa (\$4.49 for 16 ounces at Whole Foods). "It's not front-loaded with sweetness like run-of-the-mill hot chocolate. Instead, it has a really roasted flavor and a long finish. A keeper for turkey day — oops, squab day."

Our last three candidates hailed from specialty shops around San Diego. Extraordinary Desserts sold Valrhona Cocoa Powder (\$9.95 for eight ounces) and Muscovado sugar (\$2.95 for four ounces) to sweeten the pot. The specialty sugar was thought to pair well with rich flavors like chocolate, thanks to its high molasses content and strong, lingering flavor. But, however appropriate the sugar, the end result didn't give us the fireworks we were expecting, given the price. All agreed that it produced a pleasant, balanced, creamy cocoa, but lacked richness and intensity.

It turned out that you can be too rich.
The Mariebelle Aztec Hot Chocolate (\$24 for
20 ounces at In Good Taste in Coronado) was like drinking melted

chocolate. (We found it especially surprising, since we had made it with boiling water instead of milk.)

"It's an overload," admitted chocoholic Mary Ann.

"It sticks to me. Maybe I could take a shot of this, but not a whole cup." I checked the gorgeous tin, and noted that I had prepared it European-style: one cup of water. Also listed

mix to one cup of water. Also listed was an American-style recipe: one cup of mix to two cups water. That sounded more like it.

The longed-for fireworks came from the locals at Chuao's (shops in Carlsbad, Encinitas, Del Mar, and La Jolla). They sold two styles: a Spicy Maya and Hot Chocolate Abuela (each \$15 for 12 ounces). I liked the slightly spicy-hot finish on the Maya and was especially taken by the chili pepper flavor under the chocolate. Again, the texture surprised us — rich and frothy, even without milk. The Abuela sent us all into swoons. "It's like hot fudge, only not so cloying," marveled Patrick. "This is the one for Max," I smiled.

"We get our chocolate from Venezuela," said Thomas Pineda, Chuao's director of business development. "Then we grind that chocolate down into powder. It's hot chocolate based on chocolate. Most hot chocolates are based on cocoa powder, and the cocoa is depleted from all that fat and richness of true chocolate. Not to say they're not good; they're just very different. We add nonfat milk powder; that's why you only add water." The spices in the Maya version are a nod to history. "It was a very strong, potent drink, a very bitter drink — they didn't have sugar. But they did add spices." The Abuela, meanwhile, is a nod to tradition. "It actually follows Michael Antonorsi's grandma's recipe. He's co-owner and head chef." Maybe Grandma will be mollified.

Do you notice a difference in tipping between rich people and working class or between different races?

"Yes. Rich people are worse. They don't value workers. They think of you as just a babysitter for their kids. It's hard to say they are cheap, because a party I might do in Del Mar, they pay me well to be there. But when they come into the Red Robin, they might not even tip me. Or they give their child a dollar to hand me before I've even started some sword, which uses more than a dollar's worth of balloons. Blue-collar workers seem to be the best tippers. With race, I think cultures just do things different. Mexicans from Mexico don't tip. But if I tell them a price for something their kids want, they'll pay. If I tell them I work for tips, I usually get a single dollar for an entire table. With African Americans, I either get an amazing tip, or I get nothing, like I owe it to them. I can tell by the way they are talking to me that they feel this way. I'm Jewish, and I want to tell them, 'Look, my people were slaves, too.' Everyone is worse, the closer you get to Christmas."

What professions out there are you unsure of yourself when it comes to tipping?

"Flower girls downtown, taxi drivers, and skycaps. They check you in at the curb but no longer help take the bags out of the car. Birthday party entertainment. This one affects me as a mom and entertainer.

Caterers, and grocerystore baggers who walk you out to the car. They aren't allowed to accept tips."

If you don't get tipped, what do you do?

"I thank them and walk away."

Sandi goes on to explain that tipping may be discretionary, but if she's doing a complex design, and it takes more time and is creative, the person should tip accordingly. She adds, "A poodle takes me 30 seconds. I did a big tiger once that was over eight feet tall and four feet wide. That took me 90 hours."

Mike Donovan delivers pizzas for Domino's in Mira Mesa. Drivers are paid \$1.20 per run for mileage, but it's been the same for years, even with gas prices going up. Papa John's pays 65 cents. Donovan explained that the restaurant's delivery charge doesn't go to the driver, which many customers mistakenly believe. He says, "I hate the fact that everyone tips in a restaurant, and all they do is bring you the food. Maybe you get a refill on your Coke. We have to go out in the rain looking for an apartment, or trying to figure out how to get into a gated complex, or being stuck in rush-hour traffic. And we still get stiffed on tips, or someone says, 'Keep the change' when it's only 35 cents."



"Usually it's delivering to a party. It's that dynamic, of everyone throwing money into the pot; people are in a good mood. I've had times where I end up with a \$20 tip out of that. Once I had an \$8 order, where someone gave me \$20 and told me to keep the change."

What is the worst? "Aside from busy times, in the rain during football season, and getting stiffed, I once had a disabled person not tip me. When he placed the order, he wanted a lot of extra stuff. Napkins, peppers, and things like that. The guy wanted me to bring it into his house, place it on his table. I had to go back to my car and get all the extras he wanted. I didn't get a tip from him."

Who are the best tippers?

"People partying."
Do you notice a
difference in rich people or between races?

ple or between races? "I delivered in Rancho Bernardo, and the tips weren't better than Mira Mesa. I don't buy into the myth that poor people tip more. It doesn't make sense. Ultimately, people that make more money have more to throw around and will tip better. When I deliver on the Miramar Base in the barracks, sometimes the grunts tip well. The higher-ranking officers sometimes didn't tip for shit. I have found that black people don't tip. There might be one out there that does. I'm not talking about you. But you need to talk to your brothers, because they just don't tip. On the radio they talked about a university that did a huge study, and it showed that blacks are

bad tippers. They were

right."

What professions are you not sure about tipping?

"Skycaps and bus drivers. I tip generously when guys wash my car. They're putting a lot of work into it." If you don't get tipped, what do you do?

"I will ask, 'Was there anything wrong with the service?' Sometimes they say no, and I say 'Oh,' and then walk away. It's not like that helps. It's never gotten someone to open their wallet back up."

Mike goes on to explain that when he delivered flowers, he rarely got tips, but that didn't bother him. "I figured the people receiving the flowers didn't order them or weren't expecting them. So I don't expect a tip. But what bothers me about delivering pizzas is the fact that someone who should

tip doesn't, and someone who is less likely to, since they live only a few blocks from Domino's, might give you a big tip. There's no logic behind it."

He says, "And the more people drink, the bigger my tip usually is. I think they lose track of money. Tipping is also an act. You learn to take care of people, and they take care of you."

What was your best tip?

"I've gotten a \$300 tip for working eight hours, for eight people."

What's your worst tip?

"There have been two or three times where I didn't get a tip. Cheap people might tip \$10 to \$20 for an entire night."

Who are the best tippers?

"In general, it seems East Coast people are better tippers."



Do you notice a difference in races? Do poor people tip better than rich people?

"Poor people don't rent limos. It's hard to say, regarding the race of the person. It all depends on their personality, and I don't think race plays into that."

What professions are you not sure about tipping?

"Masseuses, valets, hotel luggage people,

and maids."

If you don't get tipped, what do you do?

"What can you do? I can't peel out of there in a cloud of smoke and burning rubber. I've found, though, that when you do little things for clients, they're happy. Helping ladies out of the car, cleaning the glasses, or whatever might make them feel more comfortable."

Christine Fleming has been a hairstylist for 20 years in Scripps Ranch. She says, "I was having a conversation about tipping with my husband the other day."

What was your best tip?

"Probably during the holidays. I've gotten really big tips for Christmas. Usually, since I charge a man \$30 for a haircut,

they'll give me \$3-\$5. I charge females \$40 and will get \$5–\$10. If there is a chemical service involved, it can be \$5-\$20."

What was your worst?

"Well, about 3 percent of my clients don't tip. Although, at holidays, some of those people give me gifts. They are showing their appreciation that way."

Since Christine rents her space and can charge what she wants, I tell her it's not the same as someone working at Fantastic Sam's, where they get paid every two weeks and count on tips. She can charge what she wants. Christine agrees

"La Jolla residents seem to tip good. Working in La Jolla probably helps."

Have you noticed a difference in races, or class of people?

"I don't know about the different people. When people come to La Jolla, I think they know they are going to spend money. They are going to these restaurants,

and so...the type of people coming here, most of them have money. Sometimes, you have a rich person that doesn't tip, or someone that doesn't have a fancy car, they

give you a nice tip. It's hard to tell sometimes. I've heard other people complain about certain races, but I've never experienced a problem with any other races."

"We charge \$7 per car to park, so I understand that some people won't tip us, because we already charge them to park their car. Often, only one or two dollars is all we are tipped."

The manager comes over and tells

me, "We did put a sign up that said gratuity is appreciated, because a lot of people don't know they should tip."

I talked to the owners of the Flower Box in Sorrento Valley. They didn't want to be named but had a lot of opinions on tips. One owner, the man who does most of the deliveries, answered most of my questions. He said, "There is a difference between someone carrying a pizza or two a little ways, or loaded flowers that you have to present just right, you can't break the vase or anything. If the pizza guys get tipped, I don't know why we don't. It's beyond me."

What's been your best tip?

Finesse Nails in Kearny Mesa. She does pedicures, artificial nails, spa-chair manicures, facials, massage, and waxing. She's been doing this since 1998. She told me, "Some places have their employees working on commission, so you get 50 percent of what is charged. We have reasonable prices, so tips are really appreciated. It is different if the owner of a small salon is charging a lot. In those instances, you might not tip."

What is the best tip you've ever gotten?

has been a hairstylist for 32 years. "I worked in England, Denmark, Norway, and America. I did hair for MTV in Los Angeles and some film and TV. Now I'm down here. And tips play a big factor in my profession, determining where you'll work. People will drive from Santee all the way to Encinitas or Leucadia to work, because the tips are so much

better."

What was your best tip?


"I got a \$100 tip for a regular man's haircut. Oh, John Candy once gave me \$500, on the set of *Going Berserk*. And he insisted that I eat before I leave, too."

What is the worst tip?

"Nothing, of course. When I did hair for stars, and they didn't like the hairstyle,

they just wouldn't pay me. That's even worse, because I'm not paid or tipped. On the set of Mike's Murder I finished at 5 p.m. and then Debra Winger wanted me to do her hair. I spent two and a half hours on it, and she hated it. She went into her trailer, got upset, and I wasn't paid for that extra time."

Who are the best tippers?

"The working class is the best. I can also say things about where people come from. Different nationalities have a difference about tipping. People in northern Europe don't

tip at all, and they expect a fabulous job. That's in Norway and Denmark. In England, people give tips. Just a minimum amount. When I worked in Beverly Hills, I made the most in tips. You would be surprised, though. The stars are not the best tippers, even though they make the most money."

Is there a difference among races?

"Oh, definitely. And areas of town. A hairdresser in Chula Vista will hardly make anything in tips. But in Oceanside, where all the military guys are, you might be doing \$2

haircuts, but they make \$200 or \$300 a day doing those. They give a lot of tips, but the other Oceanside resipeople, the less they tip. Let's say a Mexican person comes into my salon, and they see other people tipping;

"When they find out I'm Filipino, they impose and expect some sort of discount or figure they can tip nothing at all. That drives me nuts!"

dents don't tip so well. I think Caucasian people are more used to tipping than other races. The poorer the

they tip too, because they want to be like everyone else."

If you don't get tipped, what can you do or say about it?

"I always ask people if they are happy. This weekend, I did a teenager's hair. The father went to go shopping, and when he came back he was so mad. He had told me what he wanted, but his daughter said something different. He was furious, but he still tipped me. It can be awkward, but usually the receptionist will say, 'Is that the amount you want to put on your card, or would you like to add a gratuity to that?' I have her handle it, so I don't have to."

Tracy Ibarreta is a cartoonist and psychic medium. She started for the Bonita Vista High School newspaper but ended up working at Downtown Disney. She said, "Thanks to that job I was able to build my speed to draw one black-and-white caricature in one minute, per person. With color, it's about five minutes. between, I'm at Balboa Park on a donation/tip basis, because permits are free. I am not allowed to say an exact dollar amount, but I can suggest a tip range. I average \$5-\$10 a person, which is a fourth of what they charge at most theme parks. I do my readings in North Park, but I don't push tipping as much there. Some readers leave money out as a hint, but I chose not to. I sometimes get \$5 or \$10. When I draw, I hate it when people try to pay per page. It's okay for one person, but if five or six people are on the page, it's the same time and effort as if they were drawn on separate sheets. I also hate when I'm showered with good comments but left with a tip that says otherwise."

"I drew ten caricatures and got \$1.50. These ladies had the nerve to have me draw continuously. I drew the mom, boyfriend, and kids from pictures, and this was in addition to drawing the ladies themselves. I knew something was up when each person was slowly disappearing. I couldn't bite my tongue any longer and asked, 'Am I getting anything for this?' The last person stuck with me nervously and said, 'Um...I don't know.' I

explained to her kindly about how much my materials cost. I was near tears and extremely offended at the fact that I practically got nothing for my hard work — and very sore arm. The lady ran off and came back with \$1.50 in change."

Who are the best tippers?

"Rich people tend to tip better."

Is there a difference in the races regarding

"First and foremost, I want to make it

clear that I have received awesome tips from people of all sorts of races and religions. I think it has to do more with social classes in my experience. However, I have to say the majority, but not all, of my better tips come from Caucasians and Asians. There is a bit of irony to this, though. I am of Filipino descent and have done caricatures for older-genera-

discount or figure they can tip nothing at all. That drives me nuts! A former co-worker, also a Filipino, warned me of this when I was new in the business. For me, freebies and discounts are for people I know, regardless of race, religion, or culture."

What professions are you not sure about tipping?

"Once my tires were low on air. I went to a gas station and had never put air in my tires. It was obvious, and the mechanic came over to help. He educated me on the do's and don'ts of tire pressure, and he checked the fluids in the car. I wasn't sure whether to tip him. When I asked, he said, 'Yes,' so I gave him \$10. Even if he would've said no, I would've given him something."

If you don't get tipped, what do you do?

"I could tell them how much the stock, pens, wax pastels, and plastic covers for the drawings all cost and

how I put my heart and soul into everything I draw. At events I'm paid by the hour, so it's not as big a deal. At Balboa Park, I've never had a zero tip, but some crappy ones. The bottom line is, I accept tips all the time. And I'm a decent-to-generous tipper that is very mindful of what services are done for me. If I can't afford to tip at a certain time, then I won't go through with the service. It's only fair." ■





have no recollection of the following incident, but my mom enjoys telling me about it often: When I was about two years old, my mother's African American friend Larry came into town to visit. Upon his arrival, he and my mother walked into the living room and began reminiscing about their college years spent at UC Davis.

After a few minutes, I got up from playing with my blocks and wandered into the living room to see who our visitor was. I stood there and looked at Larry for some time. Then, without a word, I walked up to where he was sitting and took his hand in mine. I looked at the top of his dark hand curiously and then turned it over to discover its white underside. My eyes moved from his hand to his face and then to his hand again. Seemingly satisfied with what I saw, I strolled back over to my blocks. My young mind only noticed a difference between Larry and me, but I passed no judgment, for I had grown up in a nonracist home that strongly believed that what lies within a person's heart determines their worth.

It overwhelms me to think of the endless possibilities that would emerge if people today could see someone of a different race than themselves and acknowledge their differences without thinking any less of them. It saddens me to think of the horrific ways people treat each other now, especially in the United States. I mean, people look to the United States as an example of equality and equal opportunity; if people don't change soon, though, Americans will lose hope, "for where does one run to when he's already in the promised land?" (from Claude Brown's book *Manchild in the Promised Land*).

eing from a well-off white family, I would not be considered a usual target of discrimination. However, it was racism that caused my parents to move from Russia to America. Since the time of the Russian monarchy, Jewish people in Russia (among other places) have been persecuted, both publicly and privately. Though my family had only a fraction of Jewish blood, my parents, afraid that my brother and I would be teased and discriminated against in school, left behind our entire family and moved to a foreign country.

My parents have succeeded in protecting us. I

had not encountered any kind of discrimination in my 11 years in America — even having lived in Detroit — until junior year of high school. In art class, my fellow students had begun a conversation about religion. I was not interested in the discussion until they began talking about religion and compatibility. The two self-proclaimed Catholic guys agreed that they could never marry a Jew, going on to list stereotypical Jewish character flaws. I was appalled. Here I was, halfway across the globe, in a predominantly white, educated community, and facing the discrimination that my parents sought to avoid.

Now, I myself have some prejudiced opinions; everyone does. That does not mean that I go around espousing racist or sexist propaganda. The difference between a normal human being who is inherently prejudiced in some way and one we call racist is in how they express their beliefs. Sharing racist jokes with a close family member may not be politically correct, but the majority of people do it, and it is generally harmless. Problems arise when people take their opin-

ions a step further and act on them in a way that harms or offends.

There is no way to eradicate racism. Even if people do not share their opinions publicly, they will always have some prejudiced beliefs. All we can do is promote peace and eliminate the possibility of hate crimes.

little jokes and comments about minorities. They were obviously derived from more serious and consequential actions years ago.

I don't witness any acts of racism regularly, but here and there I hear pieces of information that prove racism still exists. I hear racism at 7-Eleven, where migrant workers wait patiently for a job. Some people walk by and feel embarrassed for their hardship. People should feel embarrassed for the teenagers driving away, Slurpees in hand, yelling "wetbacks!" out the window.

As an adolescent, I witness racism from others my age. It's gotten to the point where I'm used to it. It's got-

ten to the point where kids will deem it "all in good fun" and everyone just shrugs it off. The sad part is people think the "real" racism is over. People think that the '60s are over and we can all move on. We have moved on, but we've moved on to a different kind of racism, the kind of racism that is so often ignored, is given the opportunity to grow stronger and turn into a common attitude that is not only tolerated but expected.

Our racism doesn't involve Jim Crow laws and lynching, so people think it's no big deal; it's only words, so where's the harm? I'd love to say there is no harm, but I can't. And here's the kicker: we can't have sit-ins, we can't have marches, and we can't throw rallies because it's impossible to start a cause for a problem that people don't believe exists.

Hopefully, the next time you hear a racist remark you'll take the time to listen because then you'll hear the raw, natural ugliness. Then we'll be aware of a problem that we can finally start to fix.

THE PARTCH

t is a warm August morning an omen that summer heat will vie for one's attention all day and the fragments of haze that remain from the dawn seek refuge, in slowly receding shadows, from the sunlight. Inside an auditorium of the music building at San Diego State University, however, shadows dominate. They surround a dimly lit stage where a collection of large, strange, beautiful musical instruments stands in silence. Each instrument looks more like a piece of sculpture, yet each is capable of producing the sounds inside of a normal musical sound. They are made from all sorts of unlikely, though carefully tested objects, such as Pyrex containers lopped in half, eucalyptus boughs, artillery shell casings, and empty bottles of Harvey's Bristol Cream Sherry. And they have mysterious, evocative names like Zymo-Xyl, Quadrangularis Reversum, Mazda Marimba, and New Boo. They are part of the priceless, controversial legacy left behind by Harry Partch, a visionary musical composer, when he died in San Diego six years ago. Partch, a Magellan of Western music who designed and built the instruments and who explored numerous uncharted regions of sound, also left behind several theatrical/musical compositions that, when performed, roll into you like auditory tidal waves, that articulated the reaches of harmony and discord in his own heart, and that force you to add at least 35 new colors to your conception of a rainbow. He also left behind an armada of unanswered questions and problems.

Generally the death of a composer creates problems. But if the composer wrote for the conventional instruments of an orchestra, using the dominant tuning system of the West — the 12-tone scale of the piano — the problems are usually matters of interpretation and proper emphasis during a performance of the works. At age 29, however, Harry Partch gathered up 14 years of music he had written, based on what he called the "tyranny of the piano" and the 12-tone scale, and summarily burned it in a big iron stove. He termed this act his auto-da-fe, "a confession to myself that in pursuing the respectable, the widely accepted,

I had not been faithful." He felt he was only an imitator of the tradition he found dumped on him, without ever questioning the ideas that lay beneath it or its ability to express the confluence of oceanic, non-Western minisounds he heard in the world around

him. For the next four and a half decades, most of the time working in virtual obscurity, Partch devoted his entire life to the production of those sounds. Only very late in life did he acquire a belated but significant international reputation (to this day he is still more revered in Europe than in America) as both a major musical composer and as an innovative genius. When he died in 1974, he had built around 30 instruments and had devised complex theories of intonation and even of performance to accompany them. His legacy has created problems equally complex. It has constituted, in music circles, almost a national debate.

The questions are easy to ask, the problems easy to understand. Stated simply, they are: What now? Where does one go from here? What is being done, or should be done, with State University who worked with Partch for 18 years and who legally inherited the legacy, has been the focus of both praise and criticism for the work he has done with the inheritance.

Other problems intrude here as well. The instruments are in varying

states of sickness and health. While some can be replaced — improved even, as is the case with the New Boo built by local composer Cris Forster — others cannot. The Cloud-Chamber

performance, it is irreplaceable. A substitute bowl necessitates rewriting the parts of the score in which it appears. And the Harry Partch Foundation, headed by Mitchell, has only limited sources of funding at present (derived largely from the royalties on Partch's

intriguing book Genesis of a Music), a large portion of which goes into the upkeep and repair of the slowly deteriorating instruments. Also, the Harry Partch Ensemble, an ever-changing group of volunteer musicians trained to play the unique instruments, requires enormous amounts of time (yet with no financial reimbursement) from its members for rehearsals and performances. And only six or seven performers of the original ensemble remain, two of whom are leaving the area shortly.

Of this and other problems, one member of the Harry Partch Ensemble has said, "The legacy is like a dying species in a zoo. The instruments are one-of-a-kind, and

they are so cumbersome it's very expensive to get the music heard. The large fee required just to move them around is self-limiting. And yet people all over the world, who think they and only they

to play with it yet."

Others, of course, have expressed the opposite opinion, and charge that devotees of Partch are either too intellectual (or too antiintellectual), that the time has come to demystify the man and to concentrate on this or that aspect of his work (very few agreeing on which one). In fact, speaking to the various people who knew, worked with, or have since his death become involved with Partch and his work is like asking the disciples of 25 different religious sects about the true nature of the Godhead. Each sees a different Partch, contribution, and direction for the legacy.

Harry Partch was an outsider, and he liked it out there. One day in his youth, Partch recalled, he watched "bad men" through a telescope outside of the whistle-stop town of Benson, Arizona. It was 1906 and Benson, located in southeastern Arizona about 25 miles north of Tombstone, was still in the "dying gasps of the Old West," according to Partch. An occasional desperado still refused to kowtow to the call of civilization. Peering at the bad men as they were "holed up in some nearby rocks," with a local posse swarming around them, Partch said, "I fear that my five-year-old sympathies were all for the hunted."

Harry Partch was, one might say, spiritually allergic to limitations of any sort. Imagine someone dissatisfied with an apparently inexhaustible quantity — someone who finds even that quantity severely limiting for his purposes. Imagine a poet, for exam-

ple, who complains of a confinement imposed on him by his own language and grammar — a cultural conspiracy designed to restrict the expressive urges of his soul even though the same linguistic resources have served his fellow poets for centuries. Or imagine a painter who sees colors in nature for which there are no existing pigments and who must, by necessity, grind his own. Now imagine a musical composer who finds the 12-tone scale, which has served his ancestors, to be a prison that bars him from producing the sounds (and sights and colors) he experiences in the world

around him. Harry Partch was actually all three of these people. And more, since his metaphorically allergic reactions to limitation were not restricted to his art; they also dominated his life the rugged, difficult existence of an outsider. Here is one of his favorite poems, which he found on the wall of a screening room for children's films in Los Angeles (he always read with interest the writing on walls):

> Once upon a time There was a little boy And he went outside.

Partch was born in Oakland, California, in 1901. His parents had been Presbyterian missionaries in China who endured the Boxer Rebellion. Two years after his birth, they moved to southeastern Arizona to homestead, but never for long in any one place; after age 14, in fact, Partch never stayed more than three years in any single residence. He roamed all over — in Hawaii at age 20; throughout the Midwest and East (Chicago; Ithaca, New York; Madison, Wisconsin; Evanston and Champaign-Urbana, Illinois); and California (San Francisco, Sausalito, Petaluma, Gualala, Van Nuys, Venice). In 1964 he came to San Diego, first to Del Mar, then to Encinitas, and finally to a small, wood-frame, twobedroom house on Felton Street near Adams in Normal Heights. His reasons for eventually settling in this area were twofold: he was offered a teaching post at the then relatively new University of California (he lasted one term); and he especially liked the temperate climate of San Diego, since extreme changes of temperature play havoc with the delicate constitution of his instruments. But Partch never fretted all that much about where he lived. He told Rolling Stone writer Jonathan Cott, "Hell, man, I don't care where I am. If I were in the North Pole I'd go on writing. I don't care if I'm in euphoria or despair — I'd go on producing. It doesn't make any difference.

To support himself, Partch worked at the oddest of jobs; his résumé would bedazzle a perspective employer. When he was 14, he had part-time work, according to Cott, "delivering pharmaceutical drugs on his bicycle to the red-light district of Albuquerque." În his late teens Partch enrolled in the music department at USC in Los Angeles. But after six weeks, "I was fed up and quit." So he hitched to Washington, D.C., where he spent close to two years in the Library of Congress teaching himself Greek and "devouring the *idea* of music." He supported himself in this period by washing dishes seven days a week. He picked fruit during the Depression in the San Joaquin Valley. He lived as a hobo for almost ten years. He had several jobs as a proofreader (when he worked for the Brawley News, he hitchhiked from El Centro to Brawley every day). And at another time, say San Diegans John and Aleta Glasier, who met him in 1942, Partch was instrumental in the planning of Borrego Springs. "He was actually in the office of the planning commission when they laid out the city," says John.

For most of his life Partch also survived on grants, fellowships, and the university system in general. The last, however, was a financial necessity he often detested, since he felt universities to be mere repositories of musical dogma. "Ît is very difficult," he said, "to recline alongside dogma with serenity."

Because of a continual lack of funds, Partch himself had to manufacture everything he needed, like a modern-day Robinson Crusoe. In order to achieve the sounds he heard, he had to build his own instruments out of whatever materials presented themselves to his scrutiny. ("I am not an instrument builder. he said, "only a philosophical music man seduced into carpentry.") He also built countless pieces of furniture, an icebox and a cooler — for a trip from California to Madison, Wisconsin, in a used Studebaker — a shower and sunken Grecian bathtub in Gualala, California, and so

Partch attributes this capacity for self-reliance to his experiences as a hobo, from the early '30s to the early '40s."I always took a job if I could find one, but it gave me a feeling of immense satisfaction to be on my own, to be able to cook my own meal and not have to eat in some hash joint; to sleep under the stars and say, 'Thank heaven I don't have to go to a flophouse.'

"Any good hobo can take care of himself," he said. "Long ago I said to myself, 'I think life

is too precious to spend with important people. There are too many plays for status and selling: but one gets among a group of hobos, or among transient orchard workers and, right away, there's human contact. Which doesn't mean they always like each other, but there's a human contact without this fighting for place constantly. It's just a little sidelight on why I felt it necessary during the Depression to be a hobo and take a pack on my back."

And yet, during this same period, the hobo met a very important person, the Irish poet William Butler Yeats. In 1934 Partch received a Carnegie grant to study the history of musical intonation in England. While there, he made an excursion to Ireland and met with the master poet. Partch played the Adapted Viola, the first of his original instruments, and "Yeats loved it." The artistic exchange was mutual. From Yeats, Partch

received renewed impetus to explore. And one of his favorite savings comes from writing Yeats had done on theater: "I hear with older ears than the musician," said Yeats, "and the songs of the country people and of sailors delight me.... I have to find men with more music than I have, who will develop to a finer subtlety the singing of the cottage and the forecastle.

The hobo and the poet? A contradiction? Some would say so, and they would contend that the biography of Harry Partch (whom these people usually call "Partch") would be one continual listing of contradictory impulses. But others (who usually refer to the man as "Harry") argue that the most deeply human aspects of his life are its extremes and that he could range, to invert one of the chapter titles of his book, from the vacant lot to Emperor Chun. One thing is certain: Any simple attempt to label the man (as a hobo, or an intellectual, or a prophet, for example, and he has been called all three) will be misleading.

Though no two people can agree completely about the character of Harry Partch, there are several areas of intersection,





which are best summed up in the words of Danlee Mitchell. "Harry was a very responsible person. He could scream at people toward the end of his life for doing dumb, immature things. He would fly off the handle but not for long or too deeply when people wouldn't carry out a job in the most efficient amount of time. He was a completely unrepressed individual, never holding back any reaction to his environment, never suppressing anything. And yet you always knew where you stood with Harry. His tantrums would end, and later he would apologize to you with an equal amount of concern and care. Harry would never use something like guilt as a weapon of power. In fact, he hated all games of that sort. He was probably the most sane person you'd ever run across, and his fierce dedication never worked to the detriment of someone else. Harry labored his whole life on his own vision, knowing it would never be embraced as a musical fashion. He continued anyway, always faithful to his principles and to his method of disciplined

Jack Logan, an associate professor of music at San Diego State and a colleague of Mitchell's, recalls that "Partch was warm,

kind, generous — a turn-theother-cheek type." And yet Logan can also recall a day when Partch was not so. In the fall of 1969, Partch taught a course about his music at UCSD. The class, which met in an old Quonset hut on Matthews Campus at the university, was going well for the 11 or so students enrolled. Then one day Partch came in very drunk (the class met at 8:00 a.m.) and became almost violent. After an hour of dramatic flurries around the room, Partch asked the class if they understood him. When they said no, he went into a two-hour harangue about his being misunderstood in general.





that Randy and John were nothing more than "Plymouth Rock Puritans."

Seen from within the confines of tradition and conventional social mores, Partch looks extreme to most, larger-than-life to some. He wasn't larger-thanlife, just more deeply embroiled in it. He rejected what he called "specialization" in art and life. By this he meant any attitude that promotes blind acceptance of a small part of something rather than embrace the whole entity to which it belongs - settling for a knoll when you could have a mountain range. He even contended that whole entities, as presently conceived (like the entity of music), were themselves abstracted from larger units, with which they should be rejoined. Some examples should help here.

Partch was bisexual. Like Walt Whitman in this regard, with whom he shared other affini-

ties, Partch believed that nothing should be held back with respect to sexual exploration. He liked the Broadway musical Hair, for example, because he liked the uninhibited display of the human body in a theatrical setting and because he felt that to limit sexuality is to limit levels of possible reality. What is important to note here is that Partch was bisexual at a time when it was dangerous to be so. And in his sexuality, as in his musical experimentation, he had to live with the paranoia that accompanied those

Long before the most recent advent of feminism, Partch resented the conventional roles women were given. This, he argued, was a blatant example of the "specialization" he so detested, since the roles imposed definite limits for women. In particular, Partch was downright insulting when confronted with



examples of what he disparagingly termed "professional Momism"a woman who relished nothing more, in his eyes, than being a housewife. These attacks, especially the legendary tirade he delivered to one such homemaker in the nine-items-or-less checkout counter of a supermarket in Normal Heights, have given some observers the impression that Partch was a misogynist. The opposite is the case. In this instance, as in many others, newer attitudes have caught up with Partch, in whose life women played a major role. Anaïs Nin, the novelist, for instance, was a continual supporter. In 1955, after hearing a recording of Partch music, she wrote in her diary, "It was as if one had drunk the music instead of accepting it through the ears." Other women who were continual supporters include Berthe Driscoll, who wrote the first favorable review of his music; the late Betty Freeman of Los Angeles; and Aleta Glasier.

The libertine, however, was also an anchorite. His refusal to accept the authority of any dominant tradition, due to his constant distrust of specialization, is reflected in the one statement he has made, with a dash of selfeffacing irony, about his religious views. Rather than worship one god, Partch paid homage to a plurality of deities. "I am not a one-god man. I have a whole pantheon, and they're probably a little screwy, just like I am, which is perhaps why I am just as I am, and perhaps why I am so faithful to them.

It follows that the man who refused to accept the standard conception of things would not allow himself — with one huge exception — to be tied to objects in general. This Dionysus of multiple explorations was also wedded to extreme austerity; he was decidedly antimaterialistic. He wasn't all that upset, for example, when Phil Keeney (a member of the ensemble who looked after Partch in his last years and who found him dead on the bedroom floor of his Felton Street home) accidentally smashed Partch's faded blue, 11-year-old Chevy station wagon into four other cars one night in 1974. Instead, after he and others got Keeney out of jail, all Partch wanted to know was if Phil was okay. "He didn't give a damn about the Chevy," says Keeney.

On another occasion and this tale has multiple versions, which is in keeping with his pluralism — Partch was invited to compose a musical score for one of the first science-fiction movies at RKO. At almost any time in his later life, if he wanted to, Partch could have supplemented his meager income by doing work that he felt ducked beneath his standards and concepts. ("If I would write a series of 'backgrounds' for television for airplane crashes, drownings, and murders in the park, I suppose — I might make a lot of money.") Any number of other 20th-century artists have done it. So Partch was brought on the set and shown a rough-cut version of the film. Thinking he could do a good job, Partch immediately asked for more control.

When it was not granted, he told the producer and director where they could, with difficulty, shove the film. Looking back on the event, Partch said, "The only thing I would score would be a filibuster in the House."

The huge exception, of course, was the fleet of instruments he built to voyage into uncharted seas of sound: Most of the instruments, according to Partch, were built, initiated in some way, or rebuilt, in California. He began small. In 1928 he constructed an Adapted Viola, a lengthened fingerboard he had a violin-maker in New Orleans attach to a viola. Then he made a similar adaptation to a guitar in 1934. In this same year, he designed and built the Ptolemy, a large reed organ, while he was in London. He had it shipped to Santa Barbara, "where it stood abandoned in a garage." To this day the whereabouts of the Ptolemy are unknown. "The abandonment," Partch said, "was not unintended. Eight years of hoboing lay ahead." Someone must have had one titanic garage

In 1949, when he moved

to Gualala, a small community along the coast of northern California near Ft. Bragg, Partch had about ten instruments, including the Chromelodeon, an adapted harmonium about the size of a piano. To move into his new home, Partch used a makeshift trailer, towed by his old Studebaker. It took him almost a full day to make the short drive from the Coast Highway to his new residence, since he had to negotiate a narrow dirt road — a roller-coaster trail that must have been a burial ground for deceased boulders. About halfway up the grade, at a spot where both sides of the road gave way to a 1000foot drop into vacant space, the Studebaker broke an axle. Undaunted, Partch carted each fragile instrument by hand (including the cumbersome Chrome-lodeon) to its new home on the hill.

From 1949 to his death in 1974, Partch built and rebuilt around 25 string and percussion instruments. He crafted giant Kitharas, stately modified repli-

cas of the ancient Greek harplike kitharas. One of these, which stands well over six feet in height. requires two performers to play its seventy-two strings. He built several types of percussive instruments: some out of bamboo (Boo, Mbira Bass Dyad, and Eucal Blossom); some out of metal bowls, bells, and other "found objects" such as artillery shell casings (the Spoils of War) and empty bottles of Harvey's Bristol Cream Sherry and Gordon's gin (the Zymo-Xyl); and four large, resonating marimbas, made of pernambuco or brazilwood, the visual splendor and rich sound of which soon put to shame their distant cousin the xylophone (Diamond Marimba, Quadrangularis Reversum, Bass Marimba, and the Marimba Eroica).

Though he treated each of his instruments with the abundant love of an overdoting parent, Partch had a special affection for the Marimba Eroica, which is four Sitka spruce bars attached to the tops of four long, slender, boxlike resonators. Partch urged that these deep-bass resonators, which often produce sounds more felt than actually heard ("If one sits on the floor," he said, "it ripples through his bottom"), be played in the more furious passages of a score as if the "Eroicist" were "Ben Hur in his chariot, charging around the last curve of the final lap." He also dreamed of an Eroica that is not moveable, "with reinforced concrete resonators going down into the ground and blocks mounted above them like a stairway. One could then trip up the scale to bed and waltz down to breakfast in the morning — or one could trip both ways at once to a musical apotheosis."

As each new instrument appeared, transporting them became problematic. Partch once complained about management of materialism in a letter. After he was asked to make a long-distance trek with the instruments for a performance, he complained that "this is exceedingly difficult." He then poked a sharp, satirical barb at another musical innovator, known for his experiments with "found instruments." "Hell, I'm not like John Cage.

All Cage needs is a gong, a carrot juicer, and a toothbrush."

Harry Partch was a hellraiser, an iconoclast, a hobo, a visionary, a Bacchic monk, a schizophrenic (some say), a mass of complexities (or contradictions, some say), a dove and a great white shark. He was a man who, according to Harold Driscoll, "remembered all kindnesses favorably," and yet who would denounce the things he saw unfavorably with the vehemence of an evangelist. In one area he was totally consistent: he detested respected critic Jacques Barzun called "the most original and powerful contribution to dramatic music on this continent." And to which we now turn.

Harry Partch wasn't trying to stand the musical establishment completely on its ear. Rather, he wanted to rowel out the wax that had accumulated in it over the last 300 years and allow it to hear new alternatives. Partch regarded the history of music in an almost Biblical fashion, as a fall from

any single ruling attitude or tradition, about which he said, "The extent to which an individual can resist being blindly led by tradition is a good measure of his vitality."

Another thing. About the foregoing attempt to characterize him? He wouldn't have given a damn. He would have said. "Concentrate on my works, the instruments, the theories," which

wholeness into "specialization" and, his most bitterly uttered term, "abstraction." Originally, according to Partch, music was part of a much larger aesthetic unit, a combination of the aural and the visual, the human voice and human body, dance, drama - all intertwined by the religious tendrils of ritual. Somewhere along the way (Partch doesn't say specifically when)

each of these united elements became cut away, "abstracted" from the whole. The consequences of this rift are that now dancers merely dance, musicians merely play music (collared by the "inhibiting incubus of tight coats and tight shoes"), and actors merely act — each separate part having been locked into "sealed spheres of purity." And each had become entangled in its own discrete tradition, something that Partch regarded about as highly as the remains of yesterday's breakfast. "Traditions in the creative arts are per se suspect.... They exist on the patrimony of standardization, which means degeneration. They dominate because they are to the interest of some group that has the power to perpetuate them, and they cease to dominate when some equally powerful group undertakes to bend them into a new pattern." Partch was one such bender, and the new pattern he attempted to forge was a return to the wholeness he envisioned in the theatrical music of the ancient Greeks.

Partch looked everywhere around him and saw only rigidity. "The ancient, lovely, and fearless attitude toward the human body was gone." The concert hall had become petrified by "rampant formality, huge impersonal assemblies with closely placed, hard, stiff-backed seats, black and white tails, brisk robots on stage." Looking at the spectacle

of these automatons, Partch allowed himself a dash of wry nostalgia when he recalled a more innocent time. "Back in the early '20s, long before Hollywood Bowl became a cemented, be-shelled, be-uniform ushered stadium, a few of us would take sandwiches and bottles of pop high up on the hillside there, and consume them quite without regard to whether we liked or did not like the music being played. That is a singular memory, and never since has the idea of the symphony orchestra seemed so painless in contemplation." Musicians, in Partch's mind, had become second-class citizens, relegated to the pit and forced to perform like mannequins in a tuxedo shop. And, Partch says, "I have watched them jealously guard their precious misconceptions."

In place of this stolid spectacle, Partch envisioned its opposite. He put his musicians on stage, in a theatrical situation, and had them not only playing the huge instruments but also performing in the drama itself, becoming an integral part joined with the actors, mimes, and dancers, all in vigorous movement. This "body feeling" rejoins the physical aspect of man with the music, achieving not an inversion of spirit back into flesh but rather a condition in which each infuses the other with its own qualities. Partch called this coupling "Corporeality," a difficult term he never pinned down com-



pletely, though his musicians came to understand it.

When John Szanto first learned to play the Boo (sixty-four sections of bamboo arranged in seven rows that produce a sharp, dry sound), he bent over it from the waist. Formally trained as a percussionist, for John this was standard form. During a rehearsal, Partch took one look at Szanto and cut short the proceedings. He rushed over and groaned, "Man! Oh no, man! To play the Boo, you have to bend at the knees, like an athlete...not at the waist like an amateur California prunepicker!" Szanto learned Partch's dictum quickly that the instruments must be played with athletic, Corporeal grace.

Szanto also had one of those ineffable experiences that can happen to members of the Harry

Partch Ensemble during a Corporeal presentation. They were near the end of a performance of The Bewitched, a "dance satire" about lost musicians who achieve a developing "at-one-ness" through the beat of their music. The score called for Szanto to reach way down, with now tired knees deeply bent, to the lowest level of the Boo (this part comes just after section ten, entitled "The Cognoscenti Are Plunged into a Demonic Descent while at Cocktails"). Exhausted from the performance, at the conclusion of his part, Szanto collapsed to the floor, which was perfectly in keeping with his role — though not written into the score. "I fell to the floor naturally. If I would have thought of doing so beforehand, it never would have worked." That perception — the fluidity

of the spontaneous act perfectly in tune with the entire arrangement of the stage, the music, the drama, the sounds of human speech, the movement — is Corporeality. And Patch himself knew of the difficulty of sustaining it when he said, "Perception is a sand flea. It can light only for a moment. Another moment must provide its own sand flea."

What Partch was after in a Corporeal performance of his

Beethoven's works (and the composer himself) was too abstract. Any composer who tries to pole vault into the ethereal regions without being grounded, at the same time, in the soil from which he springs is not "emotionally tactile," according to Partch.

While Beethoven was too abstract for Partch, the early Elvis Presley was not. Partch saw in Presley, the unfettered kid from Memphis who sung from the

works was an "attitudinal technique." The players of his unique instruments were to be constantly aware that they are "on stage, in the act." Merely playing the notes in a masterful style, the goal of "abstract" music, was not enough. "When a player fails to take full advantage of his role in a visual or acting sense, he is muffing his part — in my terms — as thoroughly as if he bungled every note in the score." For this reason, Partch thought any performance, for example, of

hip, the occasional glimmerings of Corporeality — the dramatic fusion of human speech, music, and movement, an inseparable combination of these parts into a larger whole. Partch, however, did not appreciate the later Presley at all. He saw the man becoming an imitation of his earlier vitality, the whole being separated back into its various and obviously detectable parts once again. And Partch did not like rock and roll in general. Calling it the "dominant mediocrity" of

the day, he wrote one of his greatest musical dramas, Revelation in the Courthouse Park, partially in an attempt (only "partially" because he is after much bigger game in this masterwork) to demystify the growing, follow-theleader conformity and false idolatry he saw in popular music and music in general, all of which he called "hollow magic." "Let us give to nuts and bolts the standardization of thread that we have come to expect, but let us give to music, magic; to man, magic.... My peaks of wrath and nadirs of depression, through some four decades, were akin to the fulminations and despair of the Hebrew prophets, and for exactly the same reasons; the endowed priests of the temple sanctifying form without content, ritual without value, hollow magic." (Revelation in the Courthouse Park concentrates on two locales: ancient Thebes and modern-day Hollywood. Each city is ruled by manifestations of the same impulse to rejoin the human body into a religious context. Thebes is ruled, truly, by Dionysus, while Hollywood is ruled falsely by Dion, a contemporary rock and roll star. The latter represents nothing more than the worship of what Partch has called the "dominant mediocrity." When Partch finished the score — around 1960 — a new rock and roll star emerged -Dion, of Dion and the Belmonts. Partch only learned of this fig-

tem of tuning known as Equal Temperament — the 12-tonesper-octave scale of the piano because its 12 equal intervals distort true sounds, according to Danlee Mitchell, "in order to gain an intellectual hedge in certain compositional procedures like modulation and transposition." In all, there are four major theoretical tuning systems: Equal Temperament, Pythagorean, Meantone Temperament, and Just Intonation. Partch felt that the last, a tuning system based on the relationship of two or more tones vibrating in phase with each other (at least in their lowest vibrational relationships) is a more natural and a more precise system than any other, since it not only reflects the sounds in nature but is also in keeping with the various components and processes of the human body. And though he was by no means the first Western composer to advocate the system of Just Intonation (in 1550 a Partch-like composer named Don Nicola Vicentino experimented with it, and many non-Western cultures — Japanese, Indonesian, African, Balinese, as well as native American Indian — base their music on it), Partch was among the first to embrace completely its possibilities.

Just Intonation enabled Partch to expand the number of notes in a musical octave. This choice opened for him the floodgates of "microtonality," which means, simply, more than 12 notes per octave. Many of the instruments he built can go as high as 43 notes per octave (an "arbitrary" personal choice, he said, and by no means the limit), creating a plurality of sound, especially when combined with the other instruments and the Corporeal nature of a production. One devotee of Partch, who worked overtime for a year in New Jersey to save enough money for a flight to San Diego to catch a few rehearsals of the ensemble, said, 'The whole thing is like the Great Flood. Makes you want to build an Ark. Not to escape — but to ride those waves forever.'

It can be explained this way, using an image suggested by Jonathan Glasier. A clock has 12 numbers. Where most people just see the cardinal numbers on a clock, Partch would see through them to the mini-temporal divisions — the 60 seconds — inside. Translating the 12 numbers of the clock into the 12-tone scale, Partch contended that the majority of Western composers were stuck with those cardinal numbers (Harry might have called them "Papal" numbers since they were so predominant.) And Partch, as we have seen, couldn't put up with any sort of limitation. Calling Equal Temperament a "tyrannical monolith," he felt it "closes all doors for any meaningful adventures in consonance and dissonance" (the harmonic and discordant elements in music). He often questioned its right to rule. "The statement in the Harvard Dictionary of Music that the advantages of the system far outweigh its flaws (p. 735) is made with such authority as almost to convince me that the Dictionary got it from Bach, and that Bach got it from God."

Two features regarding Partch's break with tradition need to be stressed here. One is that

he was not an experimenter for its own sake. He was not a timid dabbler with a new microtonal toy (that would be the path of the "foolhardy" man or the "publicity-seeking mountebank," he says). The instruments he built and the scores he composed all have specific purposes. They were never designed solely for the solution of acoustical problems or theoretical issues, even though he wrote a large text about it, which many commentators have suggested does a lot of intentional leg-pulling. Partch hated theory. He always preferred the thing of something to the analysis of it. There was always an idea for each instrument, a place for it, in other words, in his overall conception. In effect, Partch left theoretical concerns for the next generation.

The second feature in need of stress is one of the wildest aspects of the whole Partch enterprise. It takes at least half an hour to tune most of the instruments before an actual performance, often even longer. But most of them go out of tune within ten minutes, and Partch knew this. The expertise required to play the instruments (and the six months required to rehearse a single performance) forestall the advent of total chaos. But part of Partch's Corporeality is that anything can happen — within the approximated guidelines of the score — on stage after the initial tuning. Colors of sound leap out that no score can document, no theory can articulate. The initial tuning, done with painstaking precision, serves as a point of departure for the multiple, yet rarely muddled, prisms of sound that emerge, an audible heterophony in which all sorts of diverse effects happen at the same time. Once during a rehearsal, Partch told one of the performers he was hearing colors not written into the score. "By God, man, keep them!" he shouted.

While, on the one hand, Partch abandoned the Western musical tradition, in his concept of Corporeality, in what he mocksnobbishly called his microtonal "adventures into acoustical profundity," and in his beautiful instruments, on the other hand many of his works focus on the speech patterns, the rhythms, and the pulse of America. His intuitive path led him to write music based on harmonized spoken words, many of which draw on his experiences as a wanderer. His large work The Wayward is composed of four smaller works, each concerned with the voice

of the streets. U.S. Highball, the musical account of a "Transcontinental Hobo Trip from San Francisco to Chicago," utilizes the language of the hobo in a non-epic, nonheroic light ("in the aloneness of his experience... his achievement in the face of small difficulties — more or less constant hunger, loss of sleep, filth, and a good deal of petty apprehension and danger — he is the focus of a work that suggests epic feelings"). Barstow, another part of The Wayward, takes its cue from "hitchhiker inscriptions copied from a highway railing," and San Francisco is filled with the cries of newsboys. Thus, amid his many departures from the norm, there is embedded into his work a return as well — a journey he felt was necessary back to the native speech patterns of his homeland.

In all of his departures to ancient patterns of Corporeal ritual, to Just Intonation and microtonality, to his emphasis on human speech — Partch never intended himself to become a tradition. "The work is not offered as a basis for a substitute tyranny," he said, "the grooving of music and musical theory into another set of conventions. What I do hope for is to stimulate creative work by example, to encourage investigation of basic factors, and to leave all others to individual if not idiosyncratic choice. To influence, yes; to limit, no."

The message of Hairy

Partch, for musicians and nonmusicians alike, is that there are still choices to be made and independent paths to pursue. On several occasions near the end of his life, Partch contended that he did not want people to consider his work the only worthy destination but rather one viable direction (deserving serious scrutiny) among many. He feared slavish imitators of his work almost as much as he feared its being misunderstood in general. Imitators, he felt, were like remora fish that attach themselves to larger fish; as they hitch a free ride, they abandon their creative responsibilities. In one of his last utterances, Partch blasted this phenomenon. "The widely revered master-disciple concept represents, on both sides, too easy an escape into the limbo of no responsibility. I have said that if anyone calls himself a pupil of mine, I will happily strangle him. But this is simply the expression of an attitude, and - amazingly—in its deeper meaning it is an expression of hope."

At the conclusion of an excellent, half-hour film about his work called The Dreamer That Remains (distributed by Tantalus Films, L.A.), Partch makes a statement that decomposes his own personal stake in the work he has done. Although he wishes that the work be understood and appreciated, Partch appends a

cryptic tag that, though not necessarily ambiguous on the surface, has generated numerous, conflicting responses, as if it were a message from the Oracle at Delphi. Partch says, like the primitive cave painters in the south of France who never signed their efforts, "I would choose to be anonymous. There is no author there. Who cares who did them? Who cares what the name was?" The various reactions to this apparently self-effacing remark reflect in microcosm what has happened to the Partch legacy since his death in 1974.

Although Partch's statement appears to divorce himself from his works, most interpreters recombine the two when they read it, and they also see in it clues for what remains to be done. John Szanto expresses at least one side of a multisided structure of opinions. "Everyone has had to resolve Partch and the legacy in some way. The music is so unique, so expensive to perform — since it can be performed only on the fragile instruments he made, which cost a bundle just to move — that maybe the music should be like Harry. Let it rest. It's done its thing. He did it, and it was great. End of movie. Credits. Like the cave painters, this was Harry's moment, and now it's gone. His wish for anonymity is the strongest affirmation of belief he could have made about what he had done."

Next to NYPD Pizza) ber of the Harry Partch Ensemble, sees a different Partch, and a different direction for the legacy. "You must remember the context in which Partch made the statement. He didn't say it in the privacy of his own home. He put it on the record, in a film about his work. It is a dramatic flourish and its intended effect was to promote himself and his works. The time has come to get beyond glorification and deification of the man, which do him an extreme injustice, and begin to take his work seriously, looking at both its strengths and weaknesses. Right now, everyone wants to use Partch the way they see him, based on their own subjectivity, which is inescapable. But we should get beyond all the rhetoric and try to see what is actually there in Partch's work."

Both Szanto and Dunn knew Partch, as did San Diego composer Kenneth Gaburo, who worked with Partch at Illinois in the '50s. Gaburo, who directed the ensemble's most recent performance in West Germany for which the German government paid \$100,000 and the success of which is also open to conflicting views among its performers - sees in Partch a host of schizophrenic contradictions. "Partch built and lived a selfdestruct system and therefore planned his own obsolescence. He didn't make it easy to repair his instruments, for example, because he built them out of such

HARRY PARTCH UPDATE

Core members of the Harry Partch Ensemble. most of whom still live in San Diego, continued to perform off and on for several years after this story came out: at the Aspen Music Festival and Boston's Cool Jazz Festival among others — "one last gasp of tremendous performances," says Francis Thumm, the Chromelodeon expert, "wonderfully on fire."

In October 1989, Randy Hoffman, who played the Cloud Chamber Bowls, trucked the instruments to New Jersey. "It was my understanding that I'd be driving them back in later November. They never returned."

The instruments went under the care of Dean Drummond at Montclair State College. They are housed in a climate-controlled space and performed occasionally

In Los Angeles, John Schneider has been recreating the instruments. Starting with copies of the guitars, he has duplicated them in the order Parch built them. A small group does a yearly concert at the Disney Redcat Theatre.

Today musicians dress in black (Partch demanded multicolored clothing) and fake the exaggerated, "corporeal" gestures that had become instinctive with the originals.

In 2000, the core nucleus — Danlee Mitchell (musical director), Jon Szanto (Boo), Phil Keeney (Spoils of War), Randy Hoffman (Cloud Chamber

Bowls), and Francis Thumm (Chromelodeon) — went to a concert in San Francisco, as spectators. Szanto had a "radically hard time" watching the polite, tasteful renditions. Francis Thumm wanted to run on stage — shouting, as Partch often did at him, "No!! Not like that!" — and show the Chromelodeon player how to stretch and stoop and pound out the tonalities. The rest just wanted to run.

rare materials. In this sense he was both a creator and a destroyer. Whatever flaws and exaltations exist in the man also exist in the music. His is a flawed system, I don't mean this as a negative statement, but rather as an affirmation of his human frailty.

Whatever influence he had in the 20th century," Gaburo continues, "has already long ago been felt. The influences have dissipated and have become other things."

And David Carey, a student of music doing his doctoral work

at UCSD, adds another position. "It is unfortunate that without his instruments, the music is impossible. Putting the instruments in a museum would kill the music, which should be not only heard but seen in a live, Corporeal performance. The most positive thing would be one production, at least, per year with financial backing, though money has always been one of the continual problems with the legacythat and giving the instruments a decent home and space for rehearsals."

As should be obvious by now, any attempt to resolve these and 25 other differing views into a clear-cut synthesis of opinion would likely be futile. Partch deeply moved everyone he touched, and yet he moved each in different ways. Some argue that he was, in fact, a deliberate promoter and that now his music should be promoted vehemently as a result. Others contend that his was a private struggle and that his work should, as Szanto says, be put to rest. Still others demand immediate access to his scores (most of which are as yet unpublished) and to his instruments — for an array of reasons that, when combined, are so vast as to seem microtonal in nature. As one member of the ensemble put it, "The legacy is like a piece of choice beef out in a desert, and the buzzards are beginning to fly in from all over."

For all of his protestations to the contrary, real or contrived, Partch left behind several clues regarding the future he wanted for his works and instruments. For those who would have them housed away in a museum: "I can only partially sympathize with the curator's attitude toward rare and unique instruments. Paintings and sculpture and many other museum objects are fulfilling their purpose in being looked at. Whether or not the dead can experience frustration, I for one feel an intense frustra-

tion for those artisans who created instruments to sound, when I see the results of their labor placarded with the injunction Do Not Touch' or displayed in locked glass cases."

On another occasion, in a manual he wrote regarding maintenance and repair of the instruments, Partch said, "The basic and essential need as of this moment is someone who can and will - if necessary - take my place (1) to see to it that the instruments are in good structural and playable condition; (2) to keep them in tune as well as this is humanly possible; and (3) to demand that they be played competently, and that the attitudes be right, even at the risk of arousing momentary hostility."

Partch left his legacy — the instruments, the scores, his writings — in the care of SDSU's Danlee Mitchell, who was one of Partch's most trusted friends. An inheritance this important, this priceless, is certain to arouse more than the "momentary hostility" of which Partch spoke. And Mitchell, who derives no personal income of any sort from the legacy, has been criticized for the essentially moderate path he has taken with respect to promoting the music. A partial reason for this, many of his admirers have suggested, is that he shies away from using the legacy in any apparently self-serving capacity. Another reason, suggested to me by Randy Hoffman, another member of the ensemble, is that "Danlee is in a no-win situation. You can't do anything without financial support. And when you don't have it, you get killed for not doing anything.

Mitchell has felt came in a blistering article written by Peter Garland, editor of a musical journal called Soundings. In 1973 Garland got Partch to agree to the publication of The Bewitched in Garland's magazine. Fortyone months later, more than three years after Partch's death, Mitchell had not sent Garland the score. So Garland shot from the hip: "Danlee has been active performing, lecturing, and teaching about Partch's work — I will grant that. But if one does not live in California, or more specifically San Diego, one is left out again."

In reply to this incident, Mitchell says, "When Garland contacted Harry, he and I were busy putting out the second edition of his book, Genesis of a Music, and we were also making the film The Dreamer That Remains. Publishing the music was not that important at that time. After Partch died, my efforts went into productions of The Bewitched and U.S. Highball, and Peter was left on the back burner. He blasted me in his journal. and I can understand his anger. He was well intentioned, but I don't think it would have worked out, because neither Peter nor I were set up to distribute the material properly after the printing. I've since given Ken Gaburo Harry's letters, documents, and rights to publish the scores, and I think everything has worked out for the betterment of Partch."

The main problem facing the legacy, according to Mitchell, is financial. "There is no grant money for maintenance," he says. "It all goes for creative work. And I don't have rich acquaintances in San Diego who would invest in the Partch Foundation as a tax-deductible contribution. Right now, the Partch Foundation receives about \$2000 per year from royalties on his book. But that's about it, and the money goes into the continual repair of the instruments.

At present, though they are the personal property of Mitchell, the instruments are housed at San Diego State. Jack Logan, another member of the music faculty there, says that the situation is inadequate. "I find it appalling that Danlee cannot find sufficient space at SDSU to house all the instruments. We have one of the most important repositories of experimental musical instruments in the world. Partch's music is still so little known that the university hasn't fully realized the potential for research and practical application that these instruments imply. We're all frustrated that this condition exists. Partch's creative imagination could be used as an example to put forth — a self-made, creative, individualistic genius. For a major university to overlook this potential seems to me to show very little foresight. But I'm sure that the leaders at SDSU are much more

able to deal with a problem like this than they have been in the past. The ideal solution, it seems to me, would be expensive but also worth it. It would be to put the instruments into a living museum, where they can be seen, repaired, and above all, where they can be heard."

In the shadows of the auditorium on this warm August morning, the instruments stand in the dim light like strange sentinels. They look like the sculpted playthings of the mythical Greek Titans of precivilization rather than the objects of such feverish concern, such a cacophony of varied opinions. A seismic shudder, of either supersonic or subterranean origin, bowls through the depths of the mesa, and a few of the stringed instruments awake briefly from their slumber and hum a barely audible, microtonal chord. "Where do things go from here?" I ask, surprised by the event and half expecting a detailed answer as a result of his momentary communication. "Perhaps," replies a voice way inside my imaginings, "perhaps only the gods know for sure. But right now they are extremely busy. They're trying to track down a fairly recent arrival, a fireball of an upstart who has gone and retimed all the lyres in paradise to his system of Just Intonation." ■

The Sun Is Not Your Friend

Most people do not realize that skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. The American Cancer Society estimates that more than 1 million cases of basal cell or squamous cell carcinoma occur annually. Fortunately, most — but not all! — of these forms of skin cancer are highly curable. Much more worrisome is the form of skin cancer known as melanoma, which we expect to diagnose in approximately 62,000 people this year alone.

The link between sunburns and melanoma is a well-established one. It is an undisputed medical fact that sun damage leads to an increased risk of melanoma. Despite our best public health efforts, however, sunburns still occur at a very high rate in the United States. In a recent survey of over 200,000 Americans, published this past month

in the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology, it was shown that just under 40 percent of respondents had experienced at least one sunburn in the preceding year's time. The survey also revealed that the highest number of sunburns occurred in people living within the highest income and educational brackets. In other words, the people who possessed the greatest means to purchase sun protection and the greatest access to public health education were the same people experiencing the most sunburns!

As surprised as I was to learn of this paradox, I was even more shocked to read an article in the Reader ("Seas the Day," "Crasher," October 12) with the bolded caption that stated: "Real boaters aren't worried about skin cancer or sunburns. We take off our shirts and embrace the sun." The fact that this quote appeared just after a paragraph relating a woman's account of her and her husband's personal battle with cancer made the editor's decision to highlight this absurd statement even more surreal.

We believe, strongly, that the statement made by this reckless "sun worshiper" is not representative of all San Diegans, let alone all members of our sailing community. Still, the point needs to be made that skin cancer is a serious medical problem, and outdoor enthusiasts — sailors and boaters included! — are at particular risk due to their prolonged sun exposure.

That said, we are sending out an S.O.S. to all San Diegans to "Slap On Sunscreen" before going out on the water! Here are some other key preventive measures to limit your sun exposure:

- Limit or avoid exposure to the sun during the midday hours (10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.), when the sun's radiation is strongest.
- When outdoors, choose sun-protective clothing! Wear a hat that shades the face, neck, and ears. When possible, wear a long-sleeved shirt and long pants.
- Wear sunglasses to prevent eye damage and to protect the skin around the
 - Use a sunscreen with

a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher. Apply the first coat to your skin about 30 minutes before going outside. Then reapply once you get outdoors and as needed throughout the day.

Likewise, recognize that the best way to identify skin cancer early is to detect changes in skin growths or the appearance of new growths. Many of the readers may already be familiar with the ABCDE Rule, which helps raise the suspicion of melanoma in moles that have one or more of the following characteristics:

- Asymmetry The mole looks different from one side of it to the other.
- Border The mole develops irregular or uneven borders.
- Color The mole changes color or takes on different colors within itself.
- Diameter The mole has a diameter of more than ½ centimeter.
- Evolution The mole grows quickly or starts to look different than other moles in the same area.

Children and adults should have their skin examined at least once a year using this helpful screening tool. Any suspicious growths or moles should be evaluated promptly by a dermatologist.

Improving skin cancer awareness is a major public health initiative in which everyone can play a role. In that spirit, we would ask that the Reader reconsider what statements it chooses to highlight for its readers. That way, an entire population of people (i.e., boaters) will not be misrepresented. Perhaps more importantly, a more accurate and universal message regarding the importance of sun protection can be realized and the risk of skin cancer, eventually, reduced.

Gospel Dance

Everyone Gets into the Spirit

hen I listen to music, I pray about it and ask the Lord, 'Is this something You want me to do? Give me the steps to go along with it,'" says Steve Beard, director of children and youth ministry for Bayview Baptist Church.

This Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, the church will celebrate ten years of liturgical dance ministry. "Liturgical dance is

sacred dance to spiritual music," Beard explains. "We start off with a praise-and-worship segment through

dance. In the opening segment, we're kind of symbolizing the goodness of God and the whole thing about the love of God." Beard's troupe is composed of 18 dancers who are between the ages of 6 and 19. The dancers will don ceremonial dancewear put together by a congregant who is a seamstress. "Some of the outfits are more angelic looking and allow for flowing movements," says Beard. "The dresses are usually flared; they really flow, especially when [dancers] turn, and add grace to the dance."

Though dance styles will vary (Beard incorporates jazz, modern ballet, and combinations of African and Caribbean movements into his compositions), the music is consistently gospel. "The praise team opens us up musically," says Beard of the church's choir. One song, "The Prayer" by Yolanda Adams, is often performed as a duet by two lead vocalists. "A lot of our choir members read music, but if we have people who are not able to [read music], they are not put aside; they just have lyric sheets." says Beard.

Gospel music can be traced back to spirituals, which are the musical ancestors

to blues and jazz. According to *negrospiritu-als.com*, some of the first spirituals, inspired by African music, were called "shouts" and "were accompanied with typical dancing, including hand clapping and foot tapping." Traditional gospel music and dance encourage improvisation, as each new move or vocal outburst is seen as the physical expression of God.

In the 1950s and 1960s, many gospel musicians such as Sister Rosetta Tharpe, Mahalia Jackson, and Thomas Dorsey gained secular popularity, as did gospel groups like the Dixie Hummingbirds and the Swan Silvertones. Carrie Sanchez, a representative from San Diego's House of Blues, says of their weekly Gospel Brunch, "It is hard to tell how many of our guests are religious, but...everyone gets into the spirit, waving their napkins in the air,

singing along, and sometimes even dancing onstage."

Gospel music has been adapted by other genres. Rock bands like P.O.D. (Payable On Death), Third Day, and Evanescence are played on gospel radio and television stations. One of the most recent styles to be claimed by hip-hop is

gospel. The organization Holy Hip Hop states as its mission, "To take the gospel to the streets through the global proliferation of spiritually enlightening Holy Hip Hop ministry — music and entertainment glorifying Christ."

Beard welcomes the nonreligious to his church's events. "I'm glad that they're there. It's an opportunity for us to witness for them, to share about Christ, by allowing them to be able to see us and what we do."

Beard views dance as a form of prayer. "Psalm 149 summons those who are 'children of Zion' to praise God's name 'in the dance.' King David 'danced before the Lord with all his might,' as related in 2 Samuel 6:14. Miriam led the people of God in a joyful dance of praise after the crossing of the Red Sea. Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians, 'Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit? Glorify God, therefore, in your body and in your spirit.""

One of the more lively numbers will be performed to the song "Midnight Cry," in which the chorus proclaims, "When Jesus steps out on a cloud to call his children /

the dead in Christ shall rise to meet Him in the air /and then those that remain shall be quickly changed / at the midnight cry, when Jesus comes again."

For this tune, Beard shares, "There will be a whole lot of jumps and kicks and flying."



OUTDOORS

Acorn Dropping reaches a crescendo early this month in the Cuyamaca, Laguna, and Palomar

Mountains. Wiry scrub oaks, massive canyon live oaks, and the golden-leaved black oaks all contribute to the growing collection of acorns littering the ground. Acorn woodpeckers are busy stuffing acorns into the small holes they drill into the bark of pine trees. Beneath the trees, the browns of bracken fern and the reds of poison oak and squaw bush are among the last expressions of autumn color we'll see in the mountains this year.

Monarch Butterflies arrive along the California coast this month, migrating from their summer homes in the Sierra Nevada and the Rocky Mountains. Some 25 of the 260 wintering sites on the West Coast lie within San Diego County. The local sites include Presidio Park in San Diego, the UCSD campus, Quail Botanical Gardens in Encinitas, and Hosp Grove in Carlsbad.

November's and December's Picturesque Sunsets and sunrises are no accident. This is the time of year when high cirrus clouds, often the precursors of storms, sweep through our area with some regularity. When cirrus or other lofty clouds are present, low-angle sunlight bathes the undersides of these clouds in a crimson luminescence. This effect is most noticeable a half hour to a few minutes before the sun rises and a few minutes to a half hour after the sun sets.

Santa Ana Winds in San Diego County often reach their greatest intensity during November, particularly at the mountain passes, where drv air from a high-pressure area over the interior deserts swoops

coastward toward a low-pressure area offshore. The subsiding air warms rapidly while it descends, resulting in 80°-90° temperatures close to the coast. While passing over the mountains, though, the dry air can be surprisingly cool — 60° or less in the daytime.



nza-Borrego's Cougar Canyon is a place where new worlds open up at every turn. There are more gorgeous sights to see along a half-mile of this canyon than in a full day's hiking in most other parts of our local desert. November is the first and April is the last decent month of the year for avoiding the area's furnace-like heat.

For about 15 years now, the approach by road to Cougar Canyon and neighboring Sheep Canyon has been getting increasingly difficult. A rough, steep section

of the Coyote Canyon road leading in has become ever more eroded and rocky, so that even the toughest of high-clearance, 4-wheel-drive vehicles have trouble negotiating it. Most Cougar-bound hikers choose to park their cars in Covote Canvon. below Lower Willows. This adds several miles of round-trip walking just to reach Cougar's mouth, and it argues for the benefit of turning

the hike into a weekend backpack

trip, overnighting at either Sheep Canyon Primitive Camp or at the mouth of Cougar Canyon. Whatever your plans, bring along all the water you'll need. Or carry a liter or two for the trip in and filter (or otherwise purify) the stream water in the canyon, which is abundant from the first autumn rains until at least April. Anza-Borrego Desert State Park rangers (760-767-5311) can help with planning.

To get to the trailhead, drive north from the end of the paved DiGiorgio Road in Borrego Springs onto the unpaved, 4-wheel-drive road up along the east side of Coyote Canyon. After 5.6 miles and two or three wet (after winter rains at least) crossings of Covote Creek. you reach a point, below Lower Willows, where the road turns sharply left to climb a steep ravine. Limited parking space can be found just below the steep grade.


On foot, follow the boulder-strewn road west over a pass and across the spacious Collins Valley. Out on the valley floor, a parallel horse/hiker's trail on the left provides a slight short-cut, though it runs through soft sand. After 3.6 miles, Sheep Canyon Primitive Camp lies ahead and a spur road for parking lies on the left (south). Follow a well-traveled trail for 0.7 mile past the end of the spur road to the wide mouth of Cougar Canyon. Less distinct paths lead you into and up the narrowing canyon, mostly to the right of the stream, for the next several hundred vards. American Vulgar: The Politics of Manipulation Versus the **Culture of Awareness**

WHAT THE PUBLISHER SAYS:

Robert Grudin is what might be called a lyrical philosopher. From Time and the Art of Living (1982) to The Grace of Great Things (1990) and On Dialogue (1996), he has tackled the traditional subjects of classic philosophy time and self, permission and freedom, creativity and individuality, imagination and innovation - with a beautiful prose style in work fueled

by American pragmatism and metaphysical exploration.

In his new book, Grudin identifies how easily misled individuals can be by a class of professional manipulators – politicians, marketers

and advertisers, media exploiters, and the like. He demonstrates the calculated effort to diminish and demean broad national awareness, cataloging how this group has managed, in fairly short order, this project of vulgarization. Robert Grudin has published in philosophy (Time and the Art of . Living, The Grace of Great Things), fiction (Book: A Novel), and academic scholarship (Mighty Opposites). A professor for years at the University of Oregon, he now lives with his wife in Hawai'i.

A CONVERSATION WITH THE **AUTHOR:**

I began my conversation with Mr. Grudin by asking what he happened to be doing in Berkeley this fall. "I actually came here to promote my book. We have

a house on Maui, where we've lived for the past five years. I knew that an unusual book like American Vulgar was going to take some effort on my part, so I put together a couple of tours through contacts that I've built over a number of years."

"Will it be good to get back home to the warmth and sunshine?"

"It will, but I won't be back there until the spring. The only way we could get out of our house there was to rent it for six months. We have a lot of friends and family in Berkeley, so we'll be spending the winter here."

Mr. Grudin shared a bit of his background.

"I've been interested in writ-

ing since age five. When I was a kid I was wonderfully supported by my family, my teachers, and my peers. Except for a ten-year hiatus in my 20s, I've been devoted to creative writing throughout my life. But, writing could not be a career course for me in my 20s, so I came here to Berkeley and got a PhD in Literature. Then I worked as a lit professor at the University of Oregon through the '70s, '80s, and '90s.

'When I was about 40, in the late 1970s, I had gotten a promotion and tenure and a brief fellowship to the Huntington Library. One morning, sitting alone in the Huntington Gardens, it occurred to me that, for the rest of my life, no one could fire



me. In other words, I had achieved total freedom of speech — at least insofar as I wanted to exert it.

"My next thought was, Well, what would I do if I did what I most wanted to do?' The answer to that came pretty easily. I had always been interested in the concept of time and its effect on human liberty. Over the next year, I collected my own meditations on time and liberty and that was ultimately published as my first nonfiction book.

"One book led to another. Over the last six books, I've wandered here and there, but the whole idea of human liberty has always been central. I've explored issues in creativity and communications, and I've written a couple of novels — one about a professor who expressed himself too freely and the other about a kind of superhero who tries to save the world.

"My most recent subject is vulgarity in America and the possible antidote to vulgarity, which is increased consciousness. We thought American Vulgar was a catchy title, but the book is really about consciousness."

For Mr. Grudin, time, creativity, dialogue, and consciousness are four aspects of freedom. The fifth, design, is the subject of his next book, which is already complete in manuscript. "You're a very busy man for someone who is supposedly retired."

"If you ever retire, you'll know that it is the time to focus your attention on something that's completely your own."

"What exactly do you mean when you use the word vulgar in your book?"

"Vulgarity needs three components: ignorance, popularity, and harm. It is fostered by people in corporations who make money from the degradation of popular taste." The fast-food industry exemplifies this notion for Mr. Grudin, but vulgarity can occur even in the most unlikely arenas.

"You can get very, very civilized - even up on the level of NPR, and still be vulgar. NPR, like other media, has to look at the bottom line, and has limited time to explore topics. For example, when [The Da Vinci Code author] Dan Brown was interviewed on NPR and asserted that he had thoroughly researched his topics in the Renaissance, he was immediately believed. Rather than someone from NPR factchecking or calling up a Renaissance scholar, he was taken at his word. Brown's readers went home thinking how smart they were because they now knew something about the Renaissance."

I proffer that there remains

comparatively little outcry against Brown's assertions. To which Mr. Grudin replies, "Only from the Church. Regarding Dan Brown and the Church, I don't care what happens. Let them fight it out."

"Brown [based his work on] a book called Holy Blood, Holy Grail, and that book was based on a hoax invented by some anti-Semites in France in the 19th Century. But, Brown referred to it as though it were historical gospel. Later on, when two of the authors of Holy Blood sued Dan Brown, they asserted that their work had been fiction. That was the only legalistic way they had to sue him. Even in the court case that he won, his scholarship was disproved."

"In your book you say something to the effect that learning isn't just a good career move. It's the last best hope for a decent life. How so?" "One of the real sources of power that anyone can wield is in language. So they became orators."

"It goes back to the early Renaissance humanists who realized that the world was not governed so much by god-given authority and popes and lords as it was governed by power relationships. They discovered that power relationships can be established in ways other than primogeniture and papal dispensation. One of the real sources of power that anyone can wield is in language. So they became

orators. They studied poetics and rhetoric — and they learned two enormous means to power and freedom. The first was eloquent expression, which obviously has to be based on honest knowledge. And the second was the ability to distinguish the truth from a lie when other people were talking to them.

"In the current century, we are all the beneficiaries of this

humanistic tradition, which, earlier in the 20th Century, was grounded on the core curricula of history, literature, and, in particular, English composition. "Currently, we are looking at the ruin — literally the ruin — of the very system that made us free. The mess we're in is caused by a combination of the rise of the fundamentalist right and the academic left's abdication of solid learning. These two forces gave each other strength. The fundamentalists are alienating the intellectuals more and more, and the academics' failure to really educate students are driving more and more people along fundamentalist paths."

"Looking across the country, are there glimmers of hope? Are there campuses on which good things are happening?"

"I like Reed very much. It did wonders for one of my sons, who is now finishing his PhD in a very sophisticated program. Then there's St. Johns. I don't know of a single large-scale school, though, that is trying to

reform its programs.

"If I ever were to get access to money, I would sponsor an annual conference on the ins and outs of core curricula and their relationship to the humanities and to citizenship."

"In your chapter about the novel, you conclude that consciousness comes at a price, in that it separates us from 'the communal hearth.' To what extent do you feel yourself a 'stranger in a strange land' these days?"

"You know, I've always felt that way. I never really grooved in academia, although there were things about teaching literature that were incredibly joyful and seductive and that kept me going. I felt a degree of community during the '90s when the first four books of mine on liberty appeared in relatively short order. My kind of life, from a popular point of view, has always had its ups and downs, but I enjoy what I do."

I ask Mr. Grudin what keeps him going. "In many respects your book paints a pretty devastating and depressing picture, and yet in the end you say there's hope. In the face of so much evidence to the contrary, what sustains your optimism?"

There are heroes that I mention throughout the book. These sustain me. People like Victor Klemperer, who decided, at the risk of his own life, to keep a record of the degradation of the Nazis during World War II. Or this guy in Washington named Banzhaf, who has devoted his life to fighting tobacco and fast-food corporations. Then there's the prosecutor, a woman, who resigned resoundingly when the Bush administration dropped tens of billions of dollars in damages that had been awarded in judgment against the tobacco companies.

With her emphasis on health and conservation and a menu rich in fresh vegetables, Berkelev restaurateur Alice Waters numbers among Grudin's heroes. For him the Chez Panisse phenomenon is a ray of hope. He writes that "Alice Waters did not set out to found a health-food restaurant, but it turned out that healthy foods tasted better than the alternatives, and she ran with the idea. As time passed, this idea became a message reverberating with innovative chefs everywhere and even inspired a new mode of education. The Chez Panisse story suggests that

American markets can, indeed, wise up and that the most energetic and sustainable reform of industry can come from within industry itself."

Mr. Grudin ends our conversation by underscoring our need, as a nation, to become more deeply conscious of the forces that manipulate us. "I am thoroughly concerned, though. And I am not overly optimistic. That's why I wrote the book. That's why I use the word vulgar. We're not just being deceived; we're being turned into slaves."



Ramona Pioneer Historical Society and Guy B. Woodward Museum is a complex of historical buildings, including the Verlague House (the only Western adobe home of French provincial design still in existence), wagons, antique exhibits, and artifacts. There is a cowboy bunk house, women's clothing and accessories from 1700 to 1800, a ranch blacksmith shop and tack room. The Casey Tibbs Memorial Exhibit is dedicated to Tibbs, a local resident who was a world-champion rodeo rider. The Bancroft Memorial Rose Garden is on the grounds. Rare documents, historical exhibits, books, photographs, and a research library are also part of the complex.

San Diego Aerospace Museum, the technological advancements made in aircraft propulsion over the last century are showcased in "100 Years of Aircraft Engines," including a functional reproduction of the 1903 Wright Flyer Engine: a Rolls-Royce liquid-cooled Merlin V-12 that powered the Spitfire and P-51 Mustang fighters; and a rare German Junkers Jumo 004, one of the world's first operational jet engines.

Concurrently, see "The History of Commercial Aviation in America." A new section of the exhibit celebrates the 40-year history of PSA, with original graphics, a re-creation of the airline's first ticket booth at Lindbergh Field, and uniforms and memorabilia donated by former employees.

"P-51 Mustang" celebrates the legendary Air Force fighter used during both World War II and Korea. The museum's Mustang is painted in the red-tail livery of the Tuskegee Airmen, who distinguished themselves flying bomber escort and ground attack missions during World War II.

The museum offers exhibits of over 65 aircraft — including an RQ-1K Predator UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle) on indefinite loan from the National Museum of the United States Air Force at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, which "saw action over the Balkans in the late 1990s"; a replica of Spirit of St. Louis, a Fokker Scourge (or Fokker Eindecker E-III), a World War I Spad VII, flight deck of the USS Yorktown, and a Lockheed Blackbird spy plane — 1400 scale models, 10,000 aviation-related items, and memorabilia from Montgolfier hot-air-balloon era to Space Age, along with an International Aerospace Hall of Fame.

The museum is located in the Ford Building in the Palisades area. 619-234-8291. (BALBOA PARK)

San Diego County Sheriff's Museum, the 150-year history of the sheriff's department is highlighted at the museum, which is located "just feet away" from the original cobblestone jail site, built in 1850. The museum boasts artifacts, photographs, equipment, uniforms, and vehicles, along with

San Diego Model Railroad **Museum**, the museum celebrates American railroads with "the largest permanent operating model railroad and toy train exhibit" in North America. There is a multimedia presentation on railroading, an operating railroad semaphore signal, and interpretive displays on railroads and model railroading. Serra Museum, "Commemorating 75 Years: The Serra Museum" is said to "remember the events leading up to the dedication of Presidio Park and the Serra Museum" on July 16, 1929. The exhibit includes a "visit back in time to 1929."

The museum interprets the Native American, Spanish, and Mexican periods of San Diego's history and contains Spanish Colonial furnishings, art, and artifacts. It's located at the site of the West Coast's first European settlement, 2727 Presidio Drive. 619-297-3258.

Birch Aquarium at Scripps, an aquarium and museum under one roof, the facility is a component of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UCSD. Look for 33 tanks containing marine life of the Pacific Northwest, the California coastline, Mexico's Sea of Cortés, and the South Pacific. One highlight is the La Jolla Kelp Tank, a two-story-high tank with giant kelp plants and nearly 30 species of local

marine life. "Sea of Genes" offers visit "to the genomic frontier"; "Earthquake! Life on a Restless Planet" explores earthquakes and their impacts on life. "Wonders of Water" waterplay area includes three interactive stations. The Lynne and Howard Robbins Shark Reef Exhibit features a 13,000-gallon shark tank with black tip, white tip, nurse, and wobbegong sharks.

The San Diego Aircraft Carrier Museum onboard the decommissioned USS Midway is open for tours, now berthed at 910 North Harbor Drive. Wells Fargo History Museum,

the museum features a working agents' office staffed by guides in period costumes and contains a working telegraph for visitors to send and receive messages. Heritage Walk Museum, the museum includes the restored Victorian House, the city's original Santa Fe Train Depot, a railroad car with model train, working blacksmith shop, and a barn. Find Heritage Walk in Grape Day Park, at 321 North Broadway; 760-743-8207. (ESCONDIDO)

Chula Vista Nature Center, an interactive living museum devoted to the endangered Southern California coastal wetlands, located in Sweetwater Marsh National Wildlife Refuge. Visitors can use a Bioscanner to view animals macroscopically, use a Wentzscope for views of microscopic organisms found in the "Sweetwater Soup," and interact with computerized videos exploring how tides affect the bay in the "Moons, Tides, and the San Diego Bay" exhibit. Pet sharks and ravs in the David A. Wergeland Shark and Ray Experience, see burrowing owls and migratory birds, and enjoy the xerophytic gardens.

Visitors meet a shuttle bus at the Bayfront E Street Trolley Station or at the center's parking lot at

San Diego Natural History Museum, "Dinosaurs: Reel and Robotic," on view through December, demonstrates how dinosaurs first came to life in movies, follows their transformation over the years through artistic portrayal and advances in scientific information and technology. Exhibit includes original movie memorabilia, posters, models, dino dig box, giant robotic dinosaurs.

"Fossil Mysteries," a new permanent exhibit, showcases last 75 million years in Southern California and Baja California region, a time known for its rich fossil record. Highlights include life-size models of Albertosaurus, Lambeosaurus, a sea cow, megalodon shark, more.

"Visions of the Natural World through the Lens of the Masters,' continuing through Sunday, March 11, is collaborative effort between museum and Ordover Gallery, with variety of nature-based photography. 

Stirring the Pot "Kids spend a lot of time listening to the radio and DJs are considered role models, so it's a major issue when DJs flat-out promote marijuana use," says Dannah Hosford of the Youth Advocacy Coalition. "91X did a 'longest bong hit' contest, and they often play drug-oriented songs at 4:20, which is police code for pot and a smoking holiday

[April 20] for kids ditching school. Most days, they also [play] the sound of a bubbling water pipe at 4:20. The DJs at 94.9 and 90.3 make stoner jokes,

and *The Mikey Show* [on Rock 105.3 did] a 'stoner spelling bee.'... What's that telling young people about drug use?"

The Youth Advocacy Coalition comprises around 60 area youths; Hosford serves as adult supervisor. In association with HARM (Health Advocates Rejecting Marijuana), they held a July rally at the local headquarters of Clear Channel and Finest City Broadcasting in Serra Mesa.

According to 17-year-old Amy K, "Within a week, we were offered meetings with [sales V.P.] Rob Worden at Finest City and Jim Richards [regional V.P.] of Clear Channel. They both agreed to produce a series of mutually agreeable anti-drug public service announcements, which we're working on with them now." She says the group still monitors local stations and documents prodrug banter and song selections.

"We're in the middle of a three-month listening audit now," says 17-year-old Joseph H. "Just yesterday, one of the 91X DJs played Sublime's 'Smoke Two Joints' at 4:20 and introduced it as 'a stoner song.' Rock 105.3 plays 'The Pot' by Tool, and on Wednesday mornings, they have stoners call in and,

Where Beer Is Cheaper

Five years ago, Camp Pendleton "E" clubs (the E stands for enlisted) hosted civilian bands for the entertainment of U.S. Marines. The manager of one of those clubs, Tracer's, would book three punk bands on one night so soldiers would stay on base and not drive drunk. One of those Marines explained why he thought the idea to bring bands on base wouldn't work.

"Ordinarily you wouldn't want to be caught dead in an E club because you might be labeled as a geek or a loser," said the Marine in 2001, when there were five clubs on Camp Pendleton. Since then, all but one club, the Double Deuce, have closed down.

"It's not cool to go [to the Double Deuce] at the moment," says Charles Price, 28, a Navy corpsman from Louisville, Kentucky, who lives on base and is a singer/songwriter/guitarist. "Something has to be wrong. Maybe it's their advertising."

Melvia Robinson, who manages the Double Deuce and the adjoining Taco Bell, says, "This year we had no bands. A few months ago we had a [female] impersonator who looked like Cher. And Saturday we have Charles."

Price approached Robinson about playing at the Double Deuce. "This is a place that has nothing to lose," he says. "They didn't listen to my music. I told them I was an acoustic musician, and they booked me right there. Of course, I'm not getting paid."

Robinson says the reason E clubs have closed down is because so many Marines are deployed in Iraq. Price does not agree.

"Look at how many people are on base right now," says Price. "There are tons of people on base. It's larger than the town I'm from.... What I've seen is that Marines would rather go somewhere else like the Gaslamp or wherever to have a good time. But if you stay on base, beer is cheaper and you save gas. I can walk back



"We don't know that any interference will be caused," says DeBoskey.

Jones says Channel 6 will continue the fight that's lasted years. "I can't tell you everything," he says. "There are a lot of legal proceedings going on."

KSDS, owned by the San Diego Community College District, has about 35 DJs

During the late '70s, the **Pretenders** made perfect '60s rock records. Along with the gritty vibe common to garage bands then, Chrissie Hvnde cultivated that slutty, underfed look of the working-class Brit rocker that Americans idolized. In 1978, two years late for the original UK punk scene, but dying to relive the glory, Hynde and original Pretenders members James Honeyman-Scott. Pete Farndon, and Martin Chambers formed a solid unit that sounded like the best of the Seeds, Velvets, Yardbirds, and the Music Machine rolled into one tight band. But in a few short years, Honeyman-Scott and Farndon were drug casualties. With them gone, the Pretenders lost their edge, as well as their great sense of rhythmic exploration.

New band members came and went, and the Pretenders, in time, simply became a brand. Critics intimated that the brand name was little more than a vehicle for Chrissie Hynde, and they were right.

Hynde was born in Ohio, went to Kent State, and moved to London and worked there as a rock journalist before playing in bands. The early Pretenders were a skin-deep lot filled with nervous tension and aggressive energy, a different group than was portrayed later by their smash U.S. hit "Brass in

Pocket," which was almost a novelty record by comparison. But even with the changes, the Pretenders were among the best of the bands on the radio during the wretched '80s, when rock took the strange left turn into grandiosity that punk had vainly tried to lampoon

What's in a name like "the Pretenders"? The truth, perhaps. Chrissie Hynde



might be all image and façade, but I'd like to think not. I need to believe that when she penned words like "I'm tired as hell / I'm not the cat I used to be / I've got a kid / I'm 33, babv." she meant them.

I lived for a little while in Portland, Oregon, during the short-lived Cocktail Nation craze. It was a ridiculous name for a ridiculous fad. but it made sense at the time. Alt-rock's spirit of sarcasm and irony had backed it into a corner where the only logical next step was a headlong dive into the sounds of the prerock era. It couldn't last: Musicians raised on three-chord punk rock did not, by and large. have the chops to convincingly play the music of Duke Ellington, Pérez Prado, Les Baxter, or even Martin Denny.

An exception was Thomas Lauderdale's Pink Martini, and that, no doubt, is why the Portland band is still playing while so many others of that era are long gone. The little newspaper I worked for in Portland treated Lauderdale like a hero - in fact, we ran a silly story about how he had a secret life as a costumed crime fighter. But it was clear even then that Pink Martini was ready to move beyond us.

Pink Martini since played with symphony orchestras all over the country and toured Europe, Greece, Turkey, Lebanon, and Taiwan. They have played the Cannes Film Festival and the grand openings of the Walt Dis-

ney Concert Hall in Los Angeles and the Bellagio Hotel in Las Vegas. Their albums have gone platinum in France. All the while they have kept a singular style, somewhere between a classical ensemble and a lounge iazz band, playing a mix of pre-Castro Cuban music and Brazilian sounds, with occasional

Lisa Hightower has a voice somewhere between Betty Boop and Etta James. She teamed up with local jazz

guitarist Peter Sprague for this album. All the songs start out a little "smooth jazz," but there are some standout guitar and sax solos to bring it back from the brink of vanilla.

A lot of the songs are covers. Listening to them only made me want to hear the original, except for Hightower's send-up of the terrible Heart song "Dog and Butterfly." Damn, that song's awful...I don't care who's singing it. Hightower redoes some rock and country songs as vocal jazz: "Purple Haze," "Walking After Midnight." They're okay, but I can't see anyone outside of the Red Fox Room getting hot under the denture adhesive for scatting. "Shibby dee doo wee doo wee" doesn't play in Pacific Beach.

I think everyone should have a jazzy CD for cocktail parties, and Hightower's voice isn't bad; she doesn't make me

cringe nor rejoice. That's how the whole album is. It's not hot stink. It's not audible gold. It's certainly not going to burn up any charts, but it might get a little play at the college jazz station.



One Thing That I Had in My Heart

Edson turned the bulky narrative into a "fast-swerving drive."

REVIEW

s dramaturge at South Coast Repertory Theatre, artistic director of Sundance Theatre Lab, and now resident artistic director of the Old Globe Theatre, Jerry Patch has helped develop over 200 world premieres, including two

Pulitzer Prize winners. He has read at least 5000 new scripts. Asked the best way for unknown playwrights to have theaters read their work, Patch says to get an agent.

"They act as filters. If an agent invests time in a script, it suggests some faith in the writer. Unsolicited plays rarely get staged." In his 37 years in theater, Patch has seen only four or five "unfiltered" manuscripts receive a full production. One, however, made it all the way.

Along with receiving submissions from agents, theaters employ play readers. Many write long, evaluative summaries. Patch prefers a promising script sent without comment.

When he was dramaturge at South Coast Rep, Patch used to give his reader, Richard Hellesen, stacks of unsolicited works to read. In 1992, without comment, Hellesen handed him a thick manuscript called *W;t*. The strange title was either a typo, a silly attempt at being cute, or the door to something original. Neither Hellesen nor Patch had heard of the author, Margaret Edson. And her subject was off-putting.

Vivian Bearing teaches English literature at an unnamed university. A rigid taskmaster, she specializes in the metaphysical poets, the "Holy Sonnets" of John Donne, in particular. When *W;t* begins the thin, 50-year-old woman is pushing an

IV pole on wheels. Completely bald, she has a hospital bracelet on her wrist and a catheter over her left breast. She's in the final stage of ovarian cancer.

"Uncomfortable with kindness," the brilliant woman goes ungently toward her end. ("Having a former student give you a pelvic exam was thoroughly degrading," she says. "I wish I had given him an A.") As she becomes "ultimately sick," Vivian reacts to an indifferent, even cruel hospital. She also realizes that, like the legendary wit of John Donne, her trial has been "not so much resolving the issues of life and God as reveling in their complexity."

One reading convinced Patch of W;t's potential. "There was a tremendous intelligence. Plus, she had a real attitude toward medical care," especially at how doctors avoid terminally ill patients' emotions, not wanting to become attached.

Patch had another partial connection. His favorite teacher at UC Santa Barbara, where Patch majored in speech and drama, was Lawrence Will-

son. In his contemporary American fiction class, "Willson challenged the hell out of you," Patch recalls, half-smile, half-shudder. "Answering a question was like stepping up to the guillotine." Like Vivian Bearing? "There's a difference: Willson challenged the smart ones and left the not-so-smart alone. Vivian cut her students no slack at all."

(In an interview, Edson confessed to mixed feelings about Vivian: "I'm not saying smart is bad. Smart is not bad, but *kind* is good.")

Edson sent copies of *W;t* to 60 American theaters. Only the South Coast Rep expressed interest. When Patch met with the mysterious Margaret Edson in Washington D.C., he learned that her late father was a political columnist, her mother, a social worker. Six feet tall and slender, Edson has an M.A. in English from Georgetown — and has always danced to her own drummer.

To spend time with her sister in Iowa City, Edson sold hot dogs during the

day and schlepped beers at night at a biker bar. She worked as a guide at the Vatican for a year, while living in a Dominican convent (knowing eight languages helped her land the job). She currently teaches elementary reading to children in Atlanta, Georgia.

W;t was her first play. She began by "just writing down talk. I'm very interested in the exact words people use. So to write a play you listen to a voice in your head."

She based it on her experiences as a clerk in the oncology/AIDS unit of a research hospital. "I wanted to write about someone who loses their power. You build up a certain set of tools. What happens if those tools don't serve you anymore?"

Edson agreed to work with Patch. He had two concerns: *W;t* was way too long, would run over three hours, he estimated. Patch has dramaturged for Beth Henley, Craig Lucas, and David Henry Hwang, savvy authors accustomed to the rigorous stages of play development. Edson was new to what can be a lengthy process.

Patch sent her notes. He never said, "This is wrong; change it." Each asked a question that suggested rethinking. For example, during intermission Edson wanted Vivian onstage in a wheelchair. That meant a three-hour play with no break for the actor. Was Edson sure about this?

Virginia Woolf said the aim of revision is "to compress and enliven." Patch visited Edson twice





in Washington, D.C. They talked all day about cutting, reshaping, tightening. Then more questions. The script was still overlong. Patch kept asking, "How much do you really need?" Was the lengthy dream sequence necessary? What would be lost if it went? What gained?

In late 1993, SCR did a reading and committed to producing W;t. Patch and director Martin Benson felt the play, still two acts, would be much more powerful if it ran straight through. Also, just before intermission. Vivian dives across a bed and vomits into a plastic bucket. Given the chance, a goodly portion of the audience might depart.

Edson told an interviewer years later that she was against any changes initially — and resisted them when they happened. Her original script "cost 50 cents more to mail than the final play. I had to cut it a lot. And that was the most difficult part.'

"Maggie was new to the


process," says Patch. "Playwrights get a note. They say, 'I'll think about it,' and off they go. Maggie wasn't used to that at first."

Working with Patch, and editing "syllable by syllable,' Edson turned the bulky narrative into a "fast-swerving drive. You're brought very quickly over to laughing and ripped right back into something harrowing - very shocking. It happens quickly and smoothly...it makes me seem like I really know what I'm doing.

Of Patch and SCR, Edson says, "I feel part of a group that did it. They took a big risk with this play. My admiration for them is complete."

The process took two and a half years. Patch says it's one of the best examples of play development he's ever done. "Every word is Maggie's. We were useful to her but didn't impede her. She was able to realize her vision."

The W;t that opened in February 1995 ran 90 minutes. The play and production won



every major award in the Los Angeles area.

And then nothing.

After SCR, Edson made minor changes and sent W;t to various theaters. When letters of rejection came back, she assumed the life of her "one little play" had ended. Letters gave diverse reasons: "cast size" [nine], "subject," "too academic," "too much talk" — an odd critique, since the play has since been hailed as a model of concision.

You could almost hear pro-

ducers behind closed doors: "Ovarian what? Pukes in a freaking what? No way!"

"It's an indictment of American theater," says Patch. "Nobody dared to do this play! All of our resident theaters turned it down. No one judged the script on its merit.'

Two years after it opened at SCR, Douglas Hughes of Connecticut's Long Wharf Theatre decided to produce W;t, in part because it had a role for his mother. Not expecting crowds, Hughes slotted it for the theater's small space. Critics came. The New York Times raved. W;t moved to the Manhattan Class Company theater in New York, later to the 500-seat Union Square Theatre. Both are Off-Broadway. After three years, the producers wanted to move it to Broadway. "No," said Edson, "it's doing fine here."

"Typical Maggie," says Patch. "She turned down Broadway. That's why she didn't get a Tony."

In 1999, W;t won the Pulitzer Prize for drama. At the ceremony, instead of bowing or blushing when she accepted the silver certificate, a reporter said Edson waited for the room to get quiet, like a teacher, then talked about the importance of children learning to read.

"New Yorkers find this very hard to believe," she told Jim Lehrer on NewsHour, "but the intricacies of New York theater are not part of what we're doing down in kindergarten.... I love teaching. And if my students are watching, turn off the TV and go read a book.'

'Again typical Maggie," says Patch, adding that when Mike Nichols made a movie of W;t, the studio rented her a limo for the world premiere. She gave Donald Margulies — Patch's other Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright—a ride home after. "Donald loved it. Maggie wasn't impressed.'

Edson teaches students to count by twos while having them sing James Brown's "I Got You (I Feel Good)." Once asked what her next project will be, she replied in all seriousness, "Insects." It wasn't a play. It was a big class project called "Six Legs over Georgia."

Edson may never write another play. "İf W;t works, it's because it's the one thing that I had in my heart. If there's something else I want to say in ten years, then I'll think about it. But I'm not interested in leaving teaching for anything.... It's so corny, but if there's a world that has more justice in it, teaching is the way for me to bring that about."



Tracy Letts's sleazy thriller tromps right down the middle of these questions. It's set in an unlikely local: a motel in Oklahoma where rock cocainetoking Agnes "hermetized herself" from her abusive ex-con husband. She meets kindly, distant Peter Evans. Her potential savior brings about even greater paranoia: he was a government subject at Groom Lake (i.e. Area 51) and may be carrying a bug virus of burrowing carnivore aphids. Agnes gets it (or is she just scratching sympathy sores?). Helicopters swarm overhead. Men in black? Or delusional ravings? Cygnet Theatre's crack design team does it again with a detail-rich motel room (Sean Murray), costumes ranging from frump to top shelf (Veronica Murphy), and lighting (Eric Lotze even has a strobe effect) and sound (George Ye, brilliant) designs that tell the story by themselves. The production, directed by Murray, is full of taut suspense, including many an eloquent silence. And the performances are quite good, especially Robin Christ's chain-smoking Angie and John DeCarlo's flip-flopping Peter. Where the production sometimes flags: as if it fears being labeled a "conspiracy theorist" (possibly this country's most dominant stereotype), it stresses Bug's comic moments. Letts created down-and-nearly-out characreal or imagined causes, often just silly. This choice gives the audience too easy an out. Sure Angie and Peter could be "hitting the pipe a little too heavy." But then again.

Worth a try.

The Glass Menagerie

Tom Wingfield must escape "this two-by-four situation" - stuck at home, dead-end job; his mother Amanda, just as mired, clings to an earlier time of bright smiles and bouquets of jonquils; and his sister, frail Laura, lives in a "world of old phonograph records and little glass crystals." Like her miniature animals, the Wingfields are a fragile menagerie. To grow, Tom must leave. But if he does, he'll shatter what remains behind (Glass Menagerie's even more poignant when you recall Tennessee Williams's life, including sister Rose's mental incarceration and lobotomy - symbolized in the play by the unicorn losing its horn — and his lifelong guilt over abandoning her). Ion Theatre's staging of this haunted drama is quite good. But at times tentative performances on opening night left a sense that, once the cast settles in, it could become even richer (Ion is running the Williams in repertory with The Grapes of Wrath; the double demands may explain the need for a final polish). Veterans Matt Scott and Dana Hooley, as Tom and Amanda, wage verbal war with some of the most dazzling language in American theater (one quibble: Hooley wears a gaudy pink dress for the Gentleman Caller that makes her seem grotesque: and Amanda can be, but she also has dreams and monstrous pain as well). Steven Lone's spot-on as the Gentleman Caller who chose this evening to practice his Andrew Carnegie skills on Sara Beth Mor-

A dinner party pretty much from hell: guests arrive a day early; sixvear-old (stuck in the terrible twos) screams in the next room; job promotion on the line; worries range from galaxies to a run in a stocking. Yasmina Reza's 90-minute comedy-drama shows the same evening three different ways: in the first, everyone goes berserk; in the second, there's ire and some calm; in the third, decorum reigns. The obvious reading sees each scene separately, as a parallel universe. But this makes the play just shallow variations on a theme. Much more interesting (and, I suspect, accurate) is to look at Life X 3 from above, like threedimensional tic-tac-toe. Each scene becomes a layer of the same event. In the first, the subtexts surface. The last stands on the other two; we see through its formality to a possible affair, shifts of status, burning resentment, even the threat of violence - all now embedded in polite banter, stable reactions, and the illusion of harmony. We read, in other words, between the lines. Each scene thickens the previous one. They grow from childhood to adulthood, from sitcom to drama (one could even give them Freudian labels: id, ego, superego). The Lamb's Players production ranks among its best in years. Surrounded by myriad stars, and a gigantic earth rolling across the rear wall, Mike Buckley's set also includes a living room on a turntable and the Milky Way spinning on the floor. The cast, smartly directed by Deborah Gilmour Smyth, shines throughout: Lance Arthur Smith as volatile (everything from a "doomed" infant to a poet) Henry; Robert Smyth's smug, contentious Hubert, Henry's boss; Glynn Bedington's Inez, as deep as she is daffy; and Colleen Kollar's manic/tender, always amazingly focused Sonia. The quartet does a kind of reverse ensemble acting. They turn 12 characters into 4 increasingly complex

Son of a Bush

Most of the setups take far, far longer than need be, and the payoffs are rarely cashable. Much opening night humor came from audience members dragged on stage. They often had better quips and better timing than the performers. Simmons kept saying that people weren't laughing because San Diego's a "conservative" town. Nope. That wasn't it. People weren't laughing because the show wasn't funny.





Rep's production begins so warm and fuzzy you hanker for ice and sandpaper. Then Robert Grossman's Morrie takes over: as his body contorts, his mind seems to brighten — far beyond the facile aphorisms he doles out like Halloween candy ("embrace life and it will embrace you back"). The Wiz

For this "reimagined" musical, Robert Brill has transformed the Mandell Weiss Theatre from a proscenium stage to an environmental space. Gleaming black and lit with lemon beams, the Yellow Brick Road winds through the theater. Objects and people drop from the sky or rise from a central circle. Oz spangles with Vegas glitterballs; the poppies are giant, flaming red-orange petals. The production dazzles. But the story and several songs have been reduced to soundbites. The technical always upstages the human. The entire cast, wearing Paul Tazewell's amazing, rainbow-hued costumes, obviously has the chops. Albert Blaise Cattafi's contorting Toto and Michael Benjamin Washington's Tinman come closest to realizing their roles. Others could amplify their characters' traits (Rashad Naylor's Scarecrow,

David Alan Grier's Wiz, Tituss Burgess's Lion). Others, like E. Faye Butler's one-note, un-scary Evillene and Heather Lee's stereotypically goofy witch Adaperle, need rethinking. In Nikki M. James, the playhouse has a splendid Dorothy. But except for her stirring "Soon As I Get Home," most of her numbers feel abridged, or half-finished. You keep wondering when the show will let her cut loose, since it's obvious she can. The Wiz could use loosening as well. It's a hip-hop remaking of Charlie Smalls's musical, but where are the rap numbers, where's the sustained funk? Opening night felt like a white "cover album" of the 1975 version. Even with a topnotch band, the show rarely suggests that it's "been down from day

As more of us work longer hours, increasing numbers of restaurants are ready to rescue us from our T-Day time-crunch by serving Thanksgiving Day dinner, either to eat-in or take home. To snag a table, better grab your phone and reserve right now — only a few neighborhood places take walkins, and the more popular the destination, the longer ahead you need to stake your claim. (Many require a credit card number, which will be charged if you're a no-show.) Save this article if you're looking ahead: Most restaurants open on T-Day are likely also to serve meals on Christmas Eve or Day, ditto New Year's, Easter, etc.

The restaurants are arranged by geographical area, so you need not drive long distances while drowsy. I haven't eaten at all of them, so caveat emptor. If there's nothing listed in your area, or you're planning a getaway, nearly all large hotels, resorts, and gambling casinos (not just those listed below) offer Thanksgiving dinners, often as buffets. If you're in a restaurant-starved region, most suburban "family-style" chains (Boston Market, Coco's, Marie Callender's, Mimi's, et al.) will also be serving a holiday menu of their customary quality.

Prices quoted below do not include tip, tax, or beverages unless so noted. "Kiddie prices" generally apply to children 5-12; toddlers usually eat free. While most prices are for multicourse meals or all-you-can-eat buffets, a few buy well-laden entrée plates.

Take-Home Turkeys

Enjoying ready-made feasts at home is a growing option. Choices range from buying a turkey that's more savory than a supermarket-roasted bird on up to purchasing the entire meal. These include: Barnes BBO, 2625 Lemon Grove Avenue (at Cvpress, tucked in the back of Liquor Mart Square), Lemon Grove, 619-462-9206. BYOBird: Tote a fully thawed raw turkey to the BBQ, and they'll smoke-cook it for you for \$1.25 per pound. You can pick it up on Wednesday, along with sides of cornbread, pies, veggies, etc. Call at least a week ahead of T-Day to reserve your smoking time. Big Jim's (see North Coast, below, for location and phone): Southern-style deep-fried whole turkeys to go, with a full dinner to feed eight for \$89, to pick up on Thursday morning. Order by the 18th. Estancia (see La Jolla): Full turkey feast to go; a whole bird serving 8-10 is \$90, a half-bird serving

4-6 is \$50, extra pies \$15 each. Order by noon, the 18th, pick up on T-day before 3:00 p.m.

Four Seasons Resort Aviara (see North Coast, below): Full feasts to go (10-15 pounds), \$210 to serve 4-6, \$350 for 7-10. Call 72 hours ahead.

Loews Coronado Bay Resort (see South Bay): "Turkey to Go" full dinner for five, \$175; for seven, \$225. Reserve 48 hours in advance.

feed 8-10, \$199, or to feed 12-15 at \$299. Turkey alone is \$75 or \$125 by size, and sides only, feeding 15, go for \$200. Order 72 hours in advance; pick up Wednesday or

Thursday at the restaurant's nearest location, or get delivery to your home for \$50 more.

Savory (see North Coast, below): A roasted turkey dinner serving 10-12 is \$235 plus tax. Call 72 hours ahead to reserve your feast.



"No questions. No sermons. Always spaghetti and meatballs."

'm so broke I can't pay attention," says

We're sitting on the wall, waiting. Three of us. Steve, Kelly, me. It's evening, around 5:15. We're facing a cream-colored stucco-church com-

pound with ferns and a big old olive tree in the patio. A sign has been hung on the railing: "Dinner Tonight. Join Us at 6:00 p.m. This is a Free Dinner Sponsored by the Holy Trinity Church and is Opened to the Public.'

I was just passing by, so — impulse — I came over and plopped

down on the wall. "Really? Open to the public?" I asked Steve. "Sure," he said. "Twice a month. Third and last Wednesdays. No questions, No means test. No sermon. It's always spaghetti and meatballs. But they're good. And they give you seconds if there's enough."

So, hey. Carla's away. And to be honest, I am kinda tapped, Still, Steve's situation makes me a little ashamed of doing this.

"I can handle kinda broke," he says. "But totally broke?"

'How broke is broke?"

"How about 30 cents till the end of the month?'

He's serious. Man. That is bee-roke.

Steve's a good-lookin', tall, straight-backed, red-bearded guy. You can't believe he's old enough to have fought in Vietnam. His skin's ruddy, healthy-looking, from living outdoors, I guess. But he did two tours, late '60s, when he was around 20. The 101st Airborne. He tells me he volunteered for the second one.

"Why?"

"Revenge. What the VC did to us the first

A guy comes out from the hall door into the courtyard. "Just so you know," he says, "Father

Sadler won't be here tonight. He passed earlier this month.

You can see a little shock go through some of the guys and women with carts who've been turning up these past 15 minutes. "He was a good man," says Steve. "He was 92. He was here last month! He'd been on the town

council here in OB. He always spoke out for the homeless."

The iron gates swing open. Steve hops up. He was here first, so he gets first in line. Then comes Kelly. Everyone shuffles toward the entrance, and then, inside the hall, along past a line of ladies behind tables, ladling out spaghetti, meatballs - nice big ones — beans, some salad on top, a mess of corn, and a round half-dumpling of garlic bread. The church people are bright, but not, like, forced happy-happy. The relationship seems to be respectful, from both sides. You end up with a nicely piled plate, plus a plastic fork and paper napkin, plus a cup of milk or coffee, and then head for a seat at this ring of tables they've set up around the sides of the hall.

"Just so you all know," says the organizer guy again, "Father Sadler passed. But believe me, he is definitely around us at this time..." His voice quavers. An old guy in a blue cap who's just put his tray down at the end of the far table stands up. He starts uttering the Lord's Prayer in a loud, shaky voice. "Our Father..." He doesn't make it to the end. "Father Sadler was good to us" is all

After a couple of moments, everybody munches into their meatballs. They taste good. The corn isn't up to much, but the garlic bread and spaghetti are tasty, and a lot of food to get

"Yes, sir," says a scholarly looking gent seated across from me. "Father Sadler was a fine man of God." This is Lawrence. Lawrence likes to stay in the OB area. "People are more accepting here," he says. "The worst place to be homeless is downtown. There are too many mean people down there.

Steve's up already, heading off for seconds. Right behind him is a big bronzed guy with Fu Manchu whiskers and gnarly bare feet. He knows the beach. "They call me Lifeguard Eric, because I saved five people from drowning this summer," he says. "I was just on hand."

I like the easy conversation. No "What brings you here?" kinda stuff. People are talking about everything from ocean currents to literature. Just don't get these guys going on the cops. "They'll snag you on illegal lodging, say, if they find you sleeping in an alley," says Steve. "We're homeless! Where are we supposed to stay? So that's \$80. They catch you with an open container, that's a \$120 fine. Where are we going to find that kind of money?"

Turns out this whole operation is run by two of the parishioners at Holy Trinity — Jon Greulich and his wife Jackie. She's the one handing out boxes of leftovers. He's a financial planner and, turns out, great-nephew of Edward R. Murrow. Whoa. The CBS newsman. "I started this program," he says, "because my three daughters were complaining that we didn't have enough stuff. They were too sheltered from the realities of life. Now they come down and help out and see what it's really like to have

Jon says tonight will have cost them probably \$80. That's out of his and Jackie's pockets.

I turn down a box of leftovers to take with me. Really, this was filling. And, yeah, helped with those end-of-month blues. Most everyone has left, and there's just this guy Dave and me still chowing down at the table. Dave says he's been homeless since he lost his crewing job on a fishing boat. Now he sleeps in a tent up in the bushes on Sunset Cliffs. "It's hard. Police harassment, keeping clean, looking for food. It takes your whole day. People don't realize how much work everything is when you're

Before the last of us leaves, Jackie announces that they'll have a special turkey Thanksgiving on November 15. "November's a good month," says Lawrence. "Every church has Thanksgiving

"We must have had 60-100 tonight," Jon says. He's on his way to lock the grilled gate. That's when this blonde girl Mary comes puffing up. "Am I too late?" She can see that she is. "Damned buses," she says. Then she's gone, as quick as she

"That's the only thing here," says Jon. "No second sittings." ■

From Zero to Stunning

"The trick is to get the wines before they're trophies."

hen Paul Krikorian took over the wine program at the La Jolla Country Club in 2003, "The 2000 Bordeaux were just coming out." His friends at Wine Warehouse helped out with allocations, and he bought heav-

ily: Mouton-Rothschild, Chateau Pavie, Chateau Monbousquet, the sorts of wines that rate over 95 points from critic Robert Parker. Elsewhere, "'01s were coming out, and there were still some '99s. If it's not great, we don't buy it." The Club's cellar, tucked into the back of a walk-in cooler behind

the laundry room, went from zero to stunning in short order.

"I pride myself on being able to get those trophy wines," says Krikorian. "The nice thing about the club is, they give me the latitude to use my judgment. When I think it's a good purchase, I get carte blanche." And years of buying have given him access to a lot of those good purchases. "You have to be smart — and nice. If the reps don't like you, it doesn't matter how much you buy. The special wines move just fine without you." You never hear about them, or you hear about one-and two-bottle allocations. "But to get quantities..."

Krikorian gets quantities, and quantities of very limited stuff. A brief perusal of the boxes and bins turns up Vega Sicilia's Unico, Pinot Noirs from Sea Smoke, Penfolds Grange Shiraz, Caymus Special Select, the Parker 100-point Cab from Quilceda Creek, Sassicaia, Ornellaia, Solaia, Biondi Santi...

How? Several ways. First, support the brand. "I won't buy good wine to get great wine, but I

will buy very good wine to get great wine. It's a give-and-take thing; when it's doable, I think it's only fair. I've got the 99-point Run Rig from Torbreck, and the 96-point Factor." To keep everybody happy, "I bought three cases of the Torbreck Woodcutters. Now, that's one of the finest val-

ues out there." Very good to get great.

Second, produce more sales. "It's like golf. There's a small percentage of people who watch golf, but they're affluent and they spend money. The La Jolla Country Club is a prestige account. You get your wines in here, and there's going to be a ripple effect. These are the people with the means to buy. They'll have a party and they'll say, 'Hey, Paul, where do I go to get such-and-such?' I'll call the rep, find out where they're selling it retail, and the member will buy five, ten cases."

Third, create a market for associated goods. Producing retail sales accounts for wines available by five- and ten-case lots. But if you ever see Bryant Family on a retail shelf, you probably don't see more than one or two bottles. Bryant Family doesn't need help selling its wines. So why do they put themselves into a private restaurant that

isn't likely to show up in the papers? Krikorian might be supplying the answer when he says that his membership is part of "the people who support their livelihood up in the valley. I get a lot of people who travel up to Napa; I pretty much set them up through the relationships I've developed over the years. They go up and join wine clubs, buy wines from wineries, and the people up there take great care of them."

Getting the wine is step one. Then comes selling it. Krikorian started with price. "I've priced everything super-fairly — once you get above \$45, everything is priced about retail. There are two things behind the pricing. One, this is a

nonprofit club; we don't need the exorbitant markups. Two, I've always fought for limited markups and increased sales. I want to sell wine; I don't want to stock wine. I sell Bryant Family Cabernet for \$400 — those are \$700 down the street, and \$1200 downtown. There's a conscious decision to keep margins as slim as possible and put the wine in people's mouths. There will always be more great wine; when it comes along, put a reasonable markup on it and sell it. I just think you're better off selling the wine and having happy customers. It takes the tension out of the air. People are starting to realize, this is the place to splurge. Members are bringing friends who are wine connoisseurs, saying, 'You won't believe the list we have over here.

Among the connoisseurs, there are differences. Krikorian tries to pay attention. "Some people like ratings. Some people like a particular style. Some people want the latest. My job is

to keep them on the cutting edge; they have the means to have whatever they want, and they're looking for something new and different. Trophyhunting is an after-the-fact game" — the press has hit, the prices are up. The trick is to get the wines before they're trophies. "You have to be palatedriven. Part of the plan was getting ahead of the curve. You read all the magazines; you know who the good winemakers are, how long they've been at a place, if they're coming or going. Something like Lynch, made by Heidi Barrett. The phone will ring: 'We've got this wine made by Heidi Barrett. It's never had any press, but I think you should taste it.' I'm a certified sommelier, a professional taster. We know if a wine has longevity, if it's going to be a star. Every Monday, I meet with a group of six sommeliers from downtown La Jolla, and we sit around and taste blind. Just to keep our palates sharp, so we don't become too dependent on salespeople and the press."





It isn't all trophy wines, of course - no list is. Even the comfortably monied have everydays. "You get to know your customer, and you get to know the price point. Slowly, you gain their trust. Maybe 50 percent of the people now don't even ask for a wine list. They just ask for me to come over and pick something out for them. 'Just a regular night for us - pick out a nice Cab.' Or, 'It's my wife's birthday tonight - we're looking for something special.

'You get to know them by letting them get to know the wines. People are still learning what they like; they don't have time. I do the work for them; I do the research. I do a lot of personal tastings at the table, an added feature to the dining experience. 'Is there anything on the list that piqued your interest — something you'd like to try, even if you don't want to purchase it?' People love to taste wine, and it's complimentary. I'll bring three Pinots to the table — we'll do light-, medium-, and full-bodied. They've just learned three new Pinots. I'll bring an Albarino to the table, talk them through the tasting: 'Are you getting apricot blossom, a little creaminess?' These are bright people; they get it — the creativity of it, the artistry."

Evidence of trust: Krikorian has been able to sell undercard varietals such as Malbec, Aglianico, and Riesling by the glass to a crowd that, three years ago, was pretty solidly in the Chardonnay camp. (It probably doesn't hurt that a glass translates to about nine ounces.) The end result: "Wine sales have been climbing dramatically. Most nights, everyone will have a glass of wine on their table, or a bottle." ■

NORTH COASTAL

Bubby's Gelato 937 South Coas Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Center, Encinitas, 760-436-3563. This tiny storefront does only a few things (sandwiches, gelati, and sorbet), but does them exceedingly well. The "gourmet sandwiches" really do live up to their designation, with intriguing Mediterranean combinations (artichoke hearts black olives, grilled eggplant, Gorgonzola are among the choice of ingredients) on soft, round Italian bread. (Or you can just get a tuna melt if that's your flavor.) Gelati are about twice as rich as Häagen Dazs, and feature an ever-changing array of bold flavors, e.g., vanilla rosewater and chocolate cinnamon. Open daily 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., closes later on Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. N.W. (10/01)

Fidel's Carlsbad 3003 Carlsbad Boulevard (at Carlsbad Village Drive), Carlsbad, 760-729-0903. It's not upscale modern Mex — no cumin-infused, mango-corn salsa on Fidel's menu but who gives a flyin' fajita when you can order just about any traditional SoCal-Mexican dish and know it's gonna be good? Whether you try the chicken-and-rice soup with fresh cilantro and avocado chunks, fluffy chile rellenos, a crab enchilada, carne asada with all the trimmings, or a lonely à la carte chicken burrito, you're going to be a happy camper. Add a reliable margarita or a beer and you're set at this popular North County mainstay. Open seven days a week for lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. -S.M. (12/03)

Firenze 162 South Rancho Santa Fe Road (at Manchester), West Village Center, Encinitas, 760-944-9000. This big. beautiful, gracious restaurant (located in the same mall as Harvest Ranch Market, just north of Rancho Santa Fe) offers both a handsome interior and a romantic fire-lit patio. The well-spaced tables are laden with huge portions of accom-plished, multiregional Italian cuisine and reasonably priced Italian and California wines (with 1/2-price wines Monday nights). Vegetarians will rejoice in the two dozen meatless selections. Lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday, dinner only on Sunday. High moderate. — N.W. (11/01)

Hill Street Coffee House 524 South Coast Highway 101, Oceanside, 760-966-0985. Organic in Oceanside? Really! Look for the sign: "Organic Restaurant and Espresso Bar" in front of a restored vellow-and-white Victorian house from O'side's past. All their meats, poultry, fish, and veggies are organic and the menu is full of healthy dishes: tofu/spinach breakfast scramble, frittata espinaca ("Greek eggs"), and pain perdu (for us peasants that's French toast) with fresh fruit and syrups. Some vegan items. After 11 a.m., try their Cajun chicken. Open daily, breakfast to dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

I Trulli Trattoria 830 South Coast Highway 101 (between G and H streets), Encinitas, 760-943-6800. An enduring hit in Encinitas (where there's no short $age\ of\ Italian\ restaurants),\ I\ Trulli\ serves$ modern Italian food with fashionable new ingredients. The menu, subtitled "Nouvelle Italian Cuisine," resembles the somewhat ambitious, generically "northern Italian" bills of fare that you encounter all over Hillcrest and the

Gaslamp. (It is, in fact, a sister restaurant to Hillcrest's Arriverderci.) The signifiers of seriousness are the pink pep percorns, goat cheese, sun-dried tomatoes, and light cream sauces that coexist with the more traditional mozzarella-tomato sauce arrays. Best bets are the daily specials, which offer the greatest chance for fresh ingredients and cre-ativity. Busy, cramped, painfully loud inside. Street patio next to highway is also noisy. Reserve for dinner on weekends or expect an hour's wait. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (11/01)

Johnny Manana's 308 Mission Avenue, Oceanside, 760-721-9999. Local teachers hang out at this green- whiteand red-tiled place because it's such good value. Most dishes are Mexican. There's a Caribbean chocolatey, black bean, paprika, curry-in-the-rice thing going on. Pescado Veracruz (fish marinated in lime juice and garlic with rice, beans, and green salad) is good. The roasted chicken is delicious. The Big Breakfast Burrito Special (eggs, onions, beans, cheese, and potatoes, wrapped in a large flour tortilla) is *muy popular*, but then so is J.M.'s Great All-American Cheeseburger. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

Osteria del Pescatore 1201 Camino Del Mar (at 12th Street), Del Mar, 858-509-9293. The restaurant's name means "Fisherman's Hostelry," and you'll find expert, courteous service and well-crafted seasonal Italian fare here with a strong emphasis on zesty fresh seafood. Go straight to the single-spaced page-long list of daily specials for the most exciting dishes, including spaghetti a cartoccio (baked in parchment paper) and lobster risotto. But save room for dessert, especially if the day's offerings include torta alla nanna, a rose-scented

Try the green salad with vibrant cranberry vinaigrette, the "Bag of Bones" (house-smoked pork ribs), the brick-roasted free-range chicken, and whatever "fruit creation is on the dessert menu. Busy and noisy; reservations urged for weekend dinners and all summer. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Full bar. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (6/05)

Red Tracton's 550 Via de la Valle, Del Mar, 858-755-6600. Even though you know you're a half mile from the Pacific Ocean and across the street from the Del Mar Racetrack, one step inside Red Tracin time to an upscale, dimly lit, maroon-

and-gilt restaurant of 1960s Chicago The only thing missing is the scent of cigars Food portions are enormous: The lobster sandwich (a touch heavy on the mayo) easily packs a half pound of lobster. The selection is generous: steaks, prime rib, seafood, chicken, and pork—all expertly prepared and served in record time. On days when you don't give a rip about the Surgeon General's latest warnings, run to Red Tracton's and indulge your All-American appetite. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner nightly; 11 p.m. closing Friday and Saturday. Expensive. — S.M. (3/04)

Spices Thai Cafe 3810 Valley Centre Drive, Piazza Carmel Shopping Center, Del Mar (east of Carmel Valley turn-off), 858-259-0889; 6785 Mira Mesa Boulevard, Mira Mesa, 858-552-8845; 16441 Bernardo Center Drive, Rancho Bernardo, 858-674-4665. Superb Thai restaurant that's not only elegant but whose food contains no MSG and very little fat. The seafood dishes rate highly. Among other delicacies are duck and frog legs. Put Spices Thai Café at the top of your list. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. -

Tomiko 87 Encinitas Boulevard (at Best Western, just west of I-5), Encinitas, 760-633-3587. In a lovely setting overlooking Moonlight Bay you can enjoy Japanese and Pacific Rim fusion cooking and sushi in a serene but lively dining room. When the sushi bar is free from the weekend rush, the quality can be

amazing: stunningly fresh uni, world-beating silky toro. The sushi-master also keeps an eye on the restaurant's seafood purchases, so they meet exacting standards. Appetizers such as "salmon tower tartare" and "drunken black cod" are rewarding, as are the simple, excellent fusion-tinged seafood entrées. Reserve for weekends, especially for sushi bar. Dinner nightly. Moderate. — N.W. (3/02)

Tuscan Sun Italian Deli 1070 North El Camino Real, Encinitas, 760-633-4546. A town abounding in Italian restaurants ought to have a great Italian deli, and it does. You'll find domestic and imported deli meats and cheeses, fresh-baked breads and focaccia, marinated veggies, and a wealth of gourmet products from Italy. The specialty is the "Caprese" (tomatoes-plus) sandwich on focaccia bread with a variety of fillings, best served grilled and dressed with pesto. The eat-in/take-out menu includes pizza, pasta, salads, and a host of sandwiches. Open daily. — N.W. (8/03)

NORTH INLAND

Ashoka the Great 9474 Black Mountain Road (off Miramar Road), Mira Mesa, 858-695-9749. Seek out this splendid Indian restaurant. The setting is lovely, the service excellent, and the food first-rate. Don't overlook the tandoori dishes. Numerous selections are available for vegetarians. An all-youcan-eat lunch buffet is served daily. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inex-

driveway west of Black Mountain Road), Mira Mesa, 858-348-0414. You'll find a taste of Hawaii in a strip mall in a neighborhood that's all-mall. The bright little "hut" has bamboo chairs, a bamboo ceiling, bare floors, and unclothed tables, with a sushi counter next to a tiny kitchen with a roaring gas grill. A large lattice awning offers outdoor seating a few steps from the door. The quality of the food is all over the map though — this is not the place to try your first Spam sushi. The seafood sushi is good, though, including a fine Rainbow Roll with really sweet crab; the more creative rolls run to cream cheese and hot sauce. "Local food" choices include a tasty ahi poké and excellent chicken katsu: the kalbi short ribs are tough, though. Plate lunches include one to three entrées (priced accordingly) with steamed or mildly garlic-flavored rice, macaroni salad, and green salad with bright orange dressing à la Kraft French. Be sure they deliver what you ordered; there may be slipups. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Very inexpensive. — N.W. (8/03)

Bistro 221 221 East Grand Avenue (near Kalmia), Escondido, 760-737-7398. This genteel bistro — Escondido, with comfortable chairs and linen-covered tables inside and a shaded patio on the sidewalk — is especially tasty at lunch, with its sophisticated quesadillas and a classic burger and fries cooked your way. At dinner simple starters shine, including a "blonde" Florida ver-

sion of gumbo and Maryland crab cakes with minimal filler. The dinner entrées are also the best, including beef tournedos with Gorgonzola and grouper caught just off the Florida shores. A "Louisiana" bread pudding is moister (hence more pleasing) than most of its namesakes. No wheelchair access for restrooms. Free parking behind restaurant. Ordinary wine list. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Friday; dinner Saturday. Lunch moderate; dinner moderate to high. - N.W. (10/04)

La Tapatia 340 West Grand Avenue Escondido, 760-747-8282. Take a walk on the mild side at this family-owned favorite, in business since the 1930s. You'll find standard Mexican fare in a comfortable dining room or, in good weather, a lovely, arbor-like stonewalled patio. The most celebrated dish is the "cheese crisp," a large tostada covered one-third in ground beef, one-third in beef chunks, and one-third in beans, with cheese, avocado puree, and sour cream over all. Many preparations (grilled seafoods, etc.) are healthy, and veggies taste fresh. Seasonings are rather de-tuned, but there's a saltshaker and a lively salsa on the table. Open daily, three meals. Moderate. — N.W. (5/01)

The Place: El Parque 2659 Reche Road, Fallbrook, 760-731-2775. Just think Little Red Riding Hood — this is Grandma's place. Okay, it's not a little old, thatched cottage — it's a creampainted metal shed with a gazebo in front. But it is in the Live Oak woods. and you can sink your teeth into some pretty fair Mexican food here, sitting alongside an interesting bunch of agricultural workers and maybe some ruby miners. Good combination plates include the tostada and beef taco, and burrito and enchilada. The time to be here is Sunday morning, when those aggies pour in here for the *menudo*, cooked in a three-foot-high pot. Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/04)

The Wayside Cafe 507 South Main Avenue, Fallbrook, 760-723-9633. Locals love meeting and eating in this long low-porched building — partly because it all just feels small-town America. The place used to be Mahrs' Service Station. You can even sit in the old Lube Bay to eat. Count on generous servings, especially the mountain-piles of red-skinned home-fries as a side at breakfast. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)


LA JOLLA

Barbarella 2171 Avenida de la Plava. La Jolla Shores, 858-454-7373. This popular restaurant sits nestled in an English garden just blocks from the beach. You can dine amidst the flora at street-side tables, in the enclosed patio, or in the small dining room. Once you're seated, the friendly staff provides fresh-out-of-the oven sourdough wheat bread to nibble on. The menu changes daily, offering fresh fish, steak, chicken, pastas, soups, and pizzas, all cooked with a twist of imagination that delivers on the flavor. For instance: pizza topped with smoked salmon, crème fraîche, chives, and fried capers. Or delicate Alaskan halibut served over creamed spring onions with a watercress salad. If a fresh fruit crêpe happens to be on the dessert menu, leap on it! Open for lunch and dinner daily.

Beach House Brewery 7536 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-6279. Don't expect to see the beach. Do expect to taste some good beers made right here and good solid food, such as the prime rib sandwich (which goes great with their Irish Stout) or the roasted potato. Or maybe best of all, the buffalo burger big, hefty, and low on cholesterol. You'd call this a family, multi-generational sports bar eatery. Nice mix. It's La Jolla, so it's not dirt cheap, but the guys here seem really interested in making interesting brews and good food to accompany them. Open for dinner seven days; lunch and dinner weekends. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (1/04)

Daily's Restaurant 8915 Towns Centre Drive, La Jolla, 858-453-1112. The idea is brilliant: Just serve food that's really, really good for your customers. Low fat, low calorie, low sodium. Brainchild of cardiac surgeon Pat O. Daily. So what's the problem? It's the "B" word. Bland. Not that they don't fight heroically to make all the dishes interesting, but lots of items have that lentil-v, beany feel. Or naked salad-y. Or steam-upyour nose veggie. Among the more interesting choices is the Cajun chicken with black beans and brown rice with cayenne-paprika in the spices. The most popular lunch order, the buffalo burger, has a little gamy aftertaste — but that just proves it is the legendarily lean prairie beast. Nice outside seating in Restaurant Row, except you've gotta re-

The Marine Room 2000 Spindrift Drive (off Torrey Pines Road), La Jolla, 858-459-7222. High cuisine, high adventure, high seas — at only moderately high prices. With chef Bernard Guillas as top toque, the Marine Room has become the quintessential great San Diego restaurant. The exhilarating coastal view meets Cal-French-Pacific Rim cuisine that's as exuberantly out-front as the waves whacking the windows. Guillas's oceanic culinary inventiveness with ultra-fresh, exotic ingredients makes every visit a voyage of discovery, and preparations are so elaborate that each listing on his precise menu reads like a whole tasting dinner. Reservations requested; slightly dressy but not stuffy. Easiest route: Make a right from westbound Torrey Pines onto Roseland or Viking and go left on St. Louis, which runs into Spindrift. Wheelchair ramp to the left of

front door. Noisy when crowded. Dinner nightly, 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Expensive. — *N.W.* (9/02)

Michele Coulon Pastries 7556-D Fay Avenue (across the street from Vons parking lot), La Jolla, 858-456-5098. The daughter of Don Coulon (retired chefowner of The Belgian Lion restaurant) and her son preside in turn at this delightful little café/bakery. (Look for it behind the octagonal sandwich shop that fronts its mini-mall.) Every ingredient is fresh and of top quality. Nine-Ten Restaurant Grande Colonial Hotel, 910 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-964-5400. Chef Jason Knibb's level of craftsmanship shows a culinary sophistication that would be at home in San Francisco or New York. You'll find adventurous, seasonal cuisine emphasizing "market fresh" local produce (much of it organic or sustainably raised), naturally raised meats, and wild seafood. It's not just the food that's fresh — the ideas are, too, and the flavormatches are flawless. 



Try, for instance the shrimp tempura roll, which wraps fried shrimp, crab shreds, daikon sprouts and Japanese mayo in deep-fried salmon skin — the combo would be just as impressive as an appetizer at a top Cal-French restaurant. The Orange Crush is another sublime invention, fresh and crunchy with veggies and *tobiko* wrapped in suave salmon. Even simple rolls are so well conceived, and the rice so nicely seasoned, you won't need soy-wasabi dip. No reservations, long waits (in cramped entryway) on weekends. Good sake list. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly, with deep discounts for happy hour specials. Moderate. Second (quieter, but with full bar) location at 1923 Calle Barcelona, 760-436-6261. N.W. (11/04)

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Cucina Italiana Clairemont Square, 4705-A Clairemont Drive, Clairemont, 858-274-9732. Chef Jose Flores, who owned the much-missed Trattoria Nostrana in La Mesa, went back to his alma mater, Via Italia — and bought it. Under the new name, the menu is much the same as at Via Italia: multi-regional authentic Italian cuisine, including won-

by the ten-inch pie, not by the slice. The restaurant is in a mall but doesn't serve mall-grub. The fresh pastas are made inhouse and rolled thin, so raviolis have more filling than skin and the rich lasagna won't send you out waddling. The numerous daily specials are the most rewarding dishes and keep dinners interesting for the many neighborhood regulars. Desserts and espresso are good; save room for millefoglie and torta della nonna when they're available. Plenty of wines by the glass. Reserve, especially for weekends and large parties. Heated patio dining in fair weather. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate (pastas and pizzas) to expensive (meat and seafood entrées). — N.W. (1/06)

King's Fish House 825 Camino de la Reina (west of Mission Center Drive), Mission Valley, 619-574-1230. To find King's in the mega-mall, go slightly west of Koo Koo Roo and follow the line of cars to the free valet parking. It's a chain, but it's a classy chain, offering fish and seafoods of a quality that's well above average, including crustaceans from a live tank and a half-dozen varieties of pristine oysters. Generously-sized entrées come with soup or salad (including a Caesar that's above suspicion) and two hefty side dishes. The vast menu of American-style preparations changes daily to reflect the fresh catch, and includes some rotating regional specialties e.g., New Orleans, Hawaii, New England). Don't miss the prawn pot-sticker appetizer, if available, and for dessert, the miraculously light bread pudding. The atmosphere is good-timey (with two patios and a barroom as well as a dining room), the service is enthusiastic, and the management will accommodate special requests if you call ahead. Kiddie menu available. Open daily, lunch and dinner, Moderate. — N.W. (5/02)

The Philadelphia Sandwich Co. 3904 Convoy Street (south of Othello), Kearny Mesa, 858-571-0888. This classic luncheonette is a monument to Philly culture, including sports pennants, his-toric photos, and colorful mummers costumes. The menu is equally devoted to the city's cuisine, especially its two great cult sandwiches: the hoagie and the cheese steak. The mixed-meat hoagie is way more than a hero — its flavor array is similar to (and just as intense as) a New Orleans muffulletta As for the cheese steak, it starts with steak strips, onions and your choice of cheese, and expands from there. Philly natives may but the luscious "Everything" with provolone is more likely to seduce the innocent. "Philly fries" (with garlic) are the right go-with. The menu also offers Pennsylvania-packaged foods ("Philadelphia Scrapple" to go, Tastykakes, Wise potato chips) to nostalgic émigrés. Lunch to early dinner nightly. Inexpensive. — N.W. (10/04)

San Tong Palace 4690 Convoy Street (between Engineer and Balboa), Kearny Mesa, 858-571-6837. This unassuming, strip-mall restaurant is easy to overlook, but once found, impossible to resist. San Tong's hybrid Korean-Chinese menu draws from these regions' tastiest styles. The Rainbow Salad demonstrates this combination deliciously, and San Tong's dumplings are outstanding. The seafood dumplings are especially remarkable. For the adventurous, I recommend the jellyfish salad, a novel treat for westerners. At San Tong Palace, curious appetites are rewarded well. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (4/99)

Tofu House 4646 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-576-6433. This stylish little eatery is proof positive that our city has matured for its specialty ethnic foods. ing up specialty tofu dishes. Flavorful, healthy foods. I highly recommend the soontofu soups (beef, pork, seafood, or mushroom) with raw egg drop you drop yourself and a side of tasty fresh kimchi. Deliver yourself from sorrowfully generic foreign food — Tofu House serves vivid ethnic food. Open daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (2/99)

THE BEACHES

Cafe Athena Pacific Mall, 1846 Garnet Avenue (at Lamont), Pacific Beach, 858-274-1140. With a more upscale, eyecatching decor and a longer and more serious menu than most Greek cafés, this is a popular destination, so be sure to reserve for dinner or you'll risk a long wait. The choices include good soups and appetizers (except for a sub-par taramasalata), outstanding moussaka, above-average gyros, and interesting, unusual desserts. There's plenty for vegetarians. Rather noisy when crowded. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (302)

Cantina Panaderia 966 Felspar Street (at Cass), Pacific Beach, 858-272-8400. This cheerful café instantly became a gathering spot for many PB-ites, including the forsaken population of adults. Chef-owner Isabel Cruz, who calls herself "Food Girl," has imported much of her Mission Cafe menu of Latin-Asian-sorta-health-food to the beach. A self-confessed "lazy cook," she focuses on wholesomeness rather than authenticity. Breakfast and lunch are the main meals here and include competent eggs, luscious scrambled eggs, huge sandwiches, and weighty slabs of coconut French toast. Competent Latin-style dishes include tamales with ainry masa. Devotees of Southeast Asian

cuisines, however, may be disappointed by the simplistic stabs in that direction. If your dish is too mild, house sauces (chili oil, salsa, chipotle sauce, etc.) are available on request. Beer and wine. Small, free front parking lot; pay lot across the street at west end of the block. Three meals daily; closed 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

Costa Brava 1653 Garnet Avenue (at Jewel), Pacific Beach, 858-273-1218. Cordial owner-host Javier Gonzalez opened this charming restaurant so that local Spaniards would have a place to gather with an authentic atmosphere of home, and indeed, the "Euro" atmosphere and late hours give a truly Iberian feel. The lively garlic-rich dishes here include a wide array of tasty tapas and, among the entrées, a paella that's made to order (sized to serve two or four; call ahead for larger groups). Patio seating in good weather. Parking lot and wheelchair access via the alley behind the restaurant. Open daily 11 a.m. to midnight, with bargain prices at Sunday brunch. Reservations advised for weekend evenings. Moderate. — N.W. (2/02)

The Fishery 5040 Cass Street, Pacific Beach, 858-272-9985. Pacific Shellfish Seafood Company founder Judd Brown got his start as a commercial fisherman. He doesn't fish anymore, but he does everything else — supplying product to top-tier restaurants, retailing glistening specimens to hungry shoppers and serving patrons who want to dine in amid the icy-blue walls and gorgeous trophy fish. The Fishery's menu is equally extensive, covering SoCal basics (excellent mahimahi burrito), lunchtime standards (sandwiches, fine malt-dredged fish and chips), sushi, and an ambitious lineup of dinnertime entrées, some of them whimsically creative (tortilla-encrusted Mexican black bass). If ambition occa-

sionally outstrips execution, an obsession with freshness helps compensate, and you get the sense that things are getting better all the time. The wine list is relatively inexpensive and carefully selected. Casual atmosphere. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — A.M. (12/03)

Humphrey's by the Bay 2241 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-224-3577. Most diners at this resort/concert venue restaurant eat at the prix fixe pre-show dinners because they guarantee good seats for the concerts at the next-door ampitheatre. But better food emerges once the music-mavens leave the premises. The kitchen features fine seafood, juicy meats, and prime steaks with seasonal veggie garnishes. Preparations are pleasing but in no way startling — it's a hotel restaurant, after all. Reserve for show-nights or to snare a window table with a gorgeous marina view. Free parking when there's no concert, valet parking when there is. Dining room pleasantly quiet. Open daily breakfast through dinner; brunch buffet Sunday. Pre-show prix fixe upper moderate, à la carte expensive/very expensive. — N.W. (2/06)

Kabuki Sushi Restaurant 4475 Mission Boulevard (entrance on Garnet), Pacific Beach, 858-270-1986. This place has a unique system of delivering tempting dishes to you via boats floating along a mini-canal that surrounds the sushi bar. You take food off and pay according to the plate size. The sushi chefs—they can be a show in themselves—have the usual panoply of sushi, sashimi, nigiri. The dragon rolls (crab, shrimp tempura, eel, avocado) and spider roll (soft-shelled crab) are tasty too. It's young and crowded here—is that because you don't have to sweat the menu, just grab what you like off the boat and chew? Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday to

Flavors are authentic, but can be monotonous due to the kitchen's reliance on commercial products (especially a heavy-flavored beef base that makes all the sauces taste alike). Good schnitzels, potato pancakes. The excellent apple strudel is the only dessert made in-house. Reservations advised, especially for patio seating. Full bar. Lunch Friday through Sunday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Moderate. — N.W. (6/02)

Red Sails 2614 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-223-3030. One of the city's oldest eateries has been renovated to look like it always has, but fresher. The dining rooms resemble those on a river paddleboat or a small, rakish cruise ship, while the bayside patio is a funky waterside pleasure, beset by pigeons. The menu runs to simple seafood and steaks (wet-aged USDA Choice), but quality is uneven. Tasty starters include briny littleneck clams on the half-shell, an interesting clam chowder, and a classy house salad (but ask for vinegar and oil on the side to dress it). The coconut shrimp entrée is a good, guilty pleasure, but the fin-fish and fried entrées taste like supermarket frozen food. For the starch accompaniment, baked potato is the most flavorful option. Full bar, strong cocktails, weak wine list. Kiddie menu available. Daily three meals until 11 p.m. Low moderate. — *N.W.* (10/04)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

El Comal 2822 Imperial Avenue, Grant Hill, 619-239-7101. (Other location at 534 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-3811.) No border compromises here — just great home-cooking from Michoacan, Guerrero, Jalisco, and Oaxaca, prepared by Luz Herrera Ibarra, a biology teacher from Acapulco. Try the huarache (cactus slices with carne asada, frijoles, cheese, and onions) or the mulita carne adobada (pork, melted cheese, and guacamole inside two tortillas) and have a glass of nuez (a refreshing walnut drink). Breakfast through dinner, closing at 9 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Lefty's Chicago Pizzeria 3448 30th Street (at Myrtle), North Park, 619-295-1720. An eight-pound pizza? That's what Lefty claims his "king of all pizzas" weighs at his often-crowded little corner pizzeria. Truth is, you can't help but be drawn, especially at night, to the little ribbon of lights framing the sidewalk canopy with its tables and benches. Lefty is determined to bring "the real Chicago" to San Diego. So of course we're talking deep-dish pizzas, as well as some thin and crispy. But the ultimate is his "stuffed" pizza, a 14-inch, eight-pound monster that needs one hour's "make and bake" time. They also do Chicago hot dogs, char burgers, beautiful spicy fries, juicy Italian beef au jus sandwiches, and a decent "Lefty's carbonara" (spaghetti, eggs, bacon, Parmesan, and cream). Open lunch and dinner six days, closed Mondays. — E.B. (5/05)

Old World Restaurant 3930 30th Street, North Park, 619-238-0568. This is a delight for anyone who loves Northern European food. Their "Great Grilled Grueben" — homemade corned beef on rye with Swiss cheese, sauerkraut, Thousand Island dressing, and mustard is, as they say, "gemütlich." Also, try the sausage platter: grilled bratwurst, kielbasa, sauerkraut, potato salad, spicy mustard, and rye bread. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

Sister Pee Wee's Soul Food 2971-1/2 Imperial Avenue, Grant Hill, 619-236-0470. One of the oldest, best soul food cafés in the county, but get there early (it closes at 6 p.m.). Sister Pee Wee says her daily lunch and dinner menu depends on what she feels like cooking that day — you might find big pork ribs with mashed red-skin potatoes, black-eyed peas, collard greens and two-inch-thick corn bread, or Southernfried chicken, or caffish fillet with all the trimmings. Sister's special is chitlins and catfish. (Call ahead about the availabil-

Tazablanca 3946 Illinois (north of University, two blocks east of 30th Street), North Park, 619-294-8292. This warm-colored, lively café offers the homey, tropical food of Cuba and some pan-Latin appetizers cooked with Cuban styling. The fried calamari is light, the papa rellena (stuffed potato) is lively, the lechón (marinated roast pork) is moist and flavorful, and the vibrant chicken fricassee with capers is irresistible. All entrées come with a salad, and the tequila-lime dressing is especially fresh tasting. Reservations for groups of six or more. Park behind the restaurant (via Grimm and the alley) or in Lumber-jacks's lot. Live band plays Thursday through Saturday evenings and is quieter than the ambient music when there's no band. Patio seating in fair weather. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Full bar including mojitos, Mexican beers, mainstream wines, and Latin soft drinks. Moderate. — N.W. (1/06)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Greek Town 345 West Main Street, El Cajon, 619-441-9708. Just another Greek buffet? Well, yes. Your choices are standard: gyros meat, *spanakopita*, moussaka, *dolmades*. And the décor is the usual blue and white with Greek island

posters. But it's the customers who give it an exotic feel, speaking languages from Russian to Greek to Somali. And if you're hungry, this all-you-can-eat deal is great. Have gyros meat, but also try the chicken souvlaki (grilled lemon chicken), or start with the excellent dolmades (grape leaves wrapped around beef and rice). The leaves' tangy taste and the lemony sauce inside get your juices running. Don't forget salad... or the dessert table (how could you leave without baklava?). Open for lunch and dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/04)

Mario's de la Mesa 8425 La Mesa Boulevard (at Grant), La Mesa, 619-461-9390. The man on the *burro* (seen on the restaurant's sign and menu) holds two flags, those of Mexico and the U.S.A. — very appropriate. Few dishes (except maybe the menudo) will push the paler palate too far in any direction but gosh-all, everything is so darn tasty. Tamales are a house special: rich, pillowy clouds of cornmeal surrounding richer shredded pork scattered with raisins for a smidgeon of sweetness. Pork also gets loving treatment in the *carnitas* rojas, big chunks browned to the barest crisp, which falls away to melting ten-derness. Great marinade (cumin?) on the *carne asada*; intense flavor and buttery richness on the "machaca sonora style" (dry-roasted shredded beef). Beans are so light as to seem whipped; rice is studded with peas and spicy carrots. Service is fast and friendly. Breakfast and lunch Sunday and Monday; three meals Tuesday through Saturday. Inexpensive. - A M (7/01)

Ranas.Com 9683 Campo Road, Suite A, Spring Valley, 619-589-1792. With 33 Mexican restaurants in the area, this Mexico City eatery has got to be good. It's a cheery place with lime green walls and orange accents. Cooking from the capital tends to be less bitingly hot than

some northern food, with unexpected taste combos, like *pollo en salsa de cacahuate* (an almost Thai-tasting chicken in peanut sauce which comes with rice, beans, and tortilla). Or try the delicious *pelangoches*, a mess of bacon, pork, pineapple, mushrooms, bell peppers, onions, and cheese. *Axtec huarache* (cactus with potato, cheese, lettuce, sour cream, and salsa) is also easy to love. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/04)

Woodstock's Pizza 6145 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-265-0999. It's a college pizza joint, but the fare rates well above standard beer ballast. For that matter, the beers — Karl Strauss and Wyder's Ciders (along with the usual Coors Light and Bud) — aren't exactly chug-suds. Crusts — white or sweetly robust whole wheat — are pressed, tossed, and then folded over at the edge, producing a spongy, crunch-crusted rim. The mozzarella is rich, gooey wholemilk; the marinara sauce is dark and spicy; and the toppings are fresh, hearty standouts. Watching your weight? Two low-fat combos (half the cheese) are available. Inexpensive. — A.M. (4/02)

FAR EAST

The Hideout Steakhouse and Saloon 27413 Highway 76, Santa Ysabel, 760-782-3656. If you're a Harley-Davidson weekend warrior, this is for you: an old dark timbered roadhouse peeking out of the trees, with its own spring-fed water wheel, 3000 feet up the mountains. Back in the thirties, Hollywood celebs (Roy Rogers, Alfalfa, et al.) used to hang out here on huntin' and fishin' trips. Now, bike enthusiasts make it their weekend day-trip destination. It still has a 1920s fireplace roaring at one end, a big pot-belly stove at the other, a honky-

tonk upright piano, and a forty-footlong oakwood bar. Cheeseburgers are the default dish. Available are a "Texassized baked potato," vegetables, salad, and squaw bread. Open Saturday and Sunday only. Inexpensive to moderate.

Owl Cafe 674 Main Street (between 6th and 7th), El Centro, 760-336-0298. This classic American café is over 50 years old and still serves good rib-sticking food morning, noon, or night. Try breakfast special #1: pancakes, two eggs, and two bacon strips. For lunch, the French dip sandwich. Full-plate dinners—and they are full—include roast beef and chicken-fried steak. Open Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. (bar until 2 a.m.); Saturday, bar only. Closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

Alex's Brown Bag 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel), Suite 171, uptown, 619-231-2912. The reborn Alex's (now in the Mr. A's building) is rightly famous for its "Original Philadelphia cheese steak sandwich" (with fried bell peppers, onions, mushrooms, and mozzarella). The owners say what makes their sandwiches so special is that they have the meat trucked in from cheese steak central, South Philly itself. Busalacchi's Ristorante 3683 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania), uptown, 619-298-0119. Remember Olympia Dukakis in *Moonstruck* retreating for comfort to her local trattoria? Busalac chi's has that settled, warm feel, but it's more interesting. Multi-levels create nooks and crannies for liaisons dangereuses, or there's the streetside casual level. Niche fountains and faux marble columns make it feel old-fashioned. Being Sicilian, they have plenty of the tomato-sauce-dominated dishes (like torta di melanzana, eggplant layered with mozzarella). But also try the excellent calamari piccata, a calamari "steak' bathed in butter, mushrooms, lemon, capers, and white wine. Simple but delish. Or salads like insalata di fileto with filet mignon, goat cheese, walnuts, eggs, and arugula. And hey, if you want to keep the budget intact, nothing wrong with spaghetti della casa. Lunch Tuesday through Friday; dinner nightly. Moderate to expensive. — E.B. (2/04)

Extraordinary Desserts 1430 Union Street (at Ash), Little Italy, 619-294-7001; also 2929 Fifth Avenue, uptown, 619-294-2132. Patrons looking for a quiet dessert still cling to the original charming cottage near Balboa Park. Those wanting more of a meal head for the newer Little Italy location, a vast, noisy space with industrial-chic decor and a menu of eclectic small plates mezze spreads, bruschettas, sandwiches, and cheese plates. Flavors tend to be intense; some creations (such as a bacon-cured salmon sandwich and *pantelleria*, a celery-date spread) are wonderful, others are exhausting even in small portions. Both locations offer pastry cases full of desserts that live up to "extraordinary," to eat on-site or to take home. Chefowner Karen Krasne incorporates flavors inspired by the global reach of her travels, from the cooking schools of Paris to the rice fields of Bali. The white cakes are food for angels. Wines (including champagnes), beers, fruit elixirs. Vege tarian-friendly menu. Both locations are open seven days, three meals, closing at 11 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and at midnight on weekends. Moderate.

Gulf Coast Grill 4130 Park Boulevard (between University and El Cajon), Hillcrest, 619-295-2244. The Gulf's faux-rustic, woodsy dining rooms and patio are great hangouts if you like a restaurant with a noisy party atmosphere. The menu focuses on the cuisine of the South and Southwest, with an emphasis on Louisiana and a heavy hand on the salt shaker. The kitchen does best with the straight Southern dishes, turning out di-vine fried soft-shelled crabs, airy hush puppies, and delicious little corn muffins. If you're deeply familiar with Cajun-Creole flavors, though, don't look for pure authenticity — you'll do better with jambalaya, étouffée, or the lunchtime oyster po' boy than with the soulless gumbo or the misconceived red beans and rice. Heated, smoker-friendly front patio. Wheelchair elevator to restrooms next to stairs. Keep an eye out for special prix fixe dinners that include tickets to museum exhibitions. Dinner reservations vital. Vast interior

We're talking "boxing arena grilled chicken," after the place where she smelled its spicy cooking aromas while growing up in Bangkok. You have a choice of five sauces to go with the chicken, from peanut to sweet pepper. Also try the noodle soups, like Tom Yam with shrimp: sinus-clearing, delicious, and surprisingly filling. The food here is real, fresh, genuine Thai cuisine with Chinese echoes — like Su-Mei Yu herself. Bandar Fine Persian Cuisine 825 and 837 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-0101. In a comfortable setting, the Persian menu offers just a "pick hits list" of popular dishes culled from this fabled cuisine, but the cooking is first rate, featuring fine ingredients prepared with care, skill, and healthfulness. The "Bandar Special" entrée combo lets you choose any two kebabs (chicken, game hen, or beef), beautifully marinated and cooked to your order. Entrées featuring rice with poultry are elaborate and refined, spiked with tangy barberries, sour cherries, or lentils and dates. The list of Persian desserts now includes Persian ice cream, a rose-scented exotic treat. Open daily for lunch (limited menu) and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (1/04)

The Field Irish Pub and Restaurant 544 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-232-9840. This spirited, colorful saloon, physically transported whole-hog from the Ould Sod, offers delicious Irish music live most nights, and also attempts serious Irish cooking — with some successes. Try the lovely herb-rich Irish stew, or the boxty, potato crêpes rolled around your choice from a variety of fillings (salmon, beef, etc.). Or start the day here with a huge, carnivorous Irish breakfast. Open daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

Greystone 658 Fifth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-0225. The Italian steakhouse fare here centers on dry-aged prime beef, game meats (including exceptionally tender bison), lob-ster, and pastas as the main draws, with indifferent starters and desserts. An impressive wine list offers rewarding California and Italian bottlings at \$35 to \$50, but roars up to the stratosphere of firstgrowth Bordeaux, super-Tuscans and scandalously overpriced Napa reds. Bossy, sometimes-abrasive waiters push higher-priced choices. Patrons are mainly "suits" with deep expense-ac-count pockets, loudly talking business or enjoying raucous office parties in a testosterone-high atmosphere. Wheelchair access to the street patio and bar area only (dining rooms are up or downstairs). Reservations urged, but may not be honored promptly. Dinner nightly. Extremely expensive. -N.W. (12/01)

Mr. Tiki's Mai Tai Lounge 801 Fifth Avenue (at F Street), Gaslamp, 619-233-1183. If you loved Trader Vic's (or can remember it, anyway), you may be amused at the revival of the genre here. Check out the "grass skirt" decor with huge tiki gods and the vaguely "is-lander" cuisine featuring, in addition, Asian fusion items, elementary sushi, and the occasional sprint into fusion-cuisine seafood. But, as you might guess, the greatest creativity in the house goes into the silly umbrella cocktails, and those are mainly delish. Age 21 and over after 9 p.m. (even with parents). Dinner nightly. Cocktails until 11 p.m., weekends until 1 a.m. Moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

The Palm 615 J Street (at Sixth Avenue), Gaslamp, 619-702-6500. This upmarket chain steakhouse, open since 1926, claims to be the oldest family-op-

country, and it's spread all over the country as well. The Gaslamp branch, its 30th, is just like all the other branches, even down to decor details, which is the whole point — business travelers with contacts to impress can rely on it wherever they go. The fare features tender, wet-aged USDA Prime beef from the chain's own wholesale butcher and, for the really high-rollers, monster-sized Nova Scotia lobsters. Other good dishes are Shrimp Bruno (with a Dijon sauce), baked crab cakes with no filler, and the "Slater Special" which combines the last two in an appetizer. Don't eat meat, but do eat gar lic? Try clams and shrimp *posillippo* and scare off the vampires. All dishes à la carte. Portions are generally gigantic on up. Key lime pie (a normal-sized wedge) makes a good, tart dessert, and clean macchinettas make outstanding espresso. Excellent wine list, plenty by the glass; full bar. Valet parking. Samba Grill 510 Fourth Avenue (Horton Plaza, top level), Gaslamp, 619-236-1000. This huge restaurant serves Brazilian food and Brazilian spirit. The format is a rodizio — waiters circulate through the room with tall swords impaling an ever-changing assortment of grilled meats (highly salted and cooked well done, but zesty nonetheless). On the side is a vast buffet of additional Brazilian entrées, vegetables, and salads. The staff are charmers, but make sure to ask for appetizer and dessert menus and the 100-bottle wine list if the server forgets to offer. Full bar includes authentic, irresistable Brazilian caipirinha lime cocktails, made by a roving "caipirinha girl." Exciting *capoeira* (martial arts-dance) performances Saturday nights on patio, about 6 p.m. Live band inside follows on weekends. Lunch and dinner daily, until 11 p.m. weekends, \$35 buys a more-than-full meal. Half price for kiddies; reduced price for buffet food only; extra cost for a special "gaucho feast" that includes additional meats, plus wild game choices upon request. -N.W. (6/06)

Their secrets are: long hours (from breakfast until after midnight daily), big meals, and small prices. The menu includes standards like spaghetti with meatballs or lasagna, including sides of garlic bread, soup, or salad. The hit with kids is "Papa's Favorite," an 8-inch pizza with mushrooms, pepperoni, and sausage. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/01)

Mary J's Cafe 1930 Cleveland Avenue, National City, 619-477-6645 or 619-477-5306. Mary J and her café have been around for 40 years and about the only thing to change is the prices. This is the real National City. The regulars start piling in at 5 a.m. Mary always has specials going, but check the big board menu above the stove too. One of their most popular items is the Trucker's Breakfast (three eggs, ham, bacon or sausage, home fries, and toast), or steak and eggs with hash browns and toast. Mary's son Vic, the morning cook, always gives you more than enough. For lunch or early dinner, try the meat loaf with mixed veggies, boiled potatoes covered with gravy, toast, and soup or salad. Head south if you're looking for a great dry-aged, mesquite-broiled steak at a bargain price — but don't stop there. Try the house specialty, quail with garlic sauce (codorniz al mojo de ajo), or venison, especially the sayory machaca de venado (strips of meat with peppers, onions, and tomatoes). Both are locally raised on the restaurant's own ranches, and may be united in a brilliant breakfast of quail eggs with deer machaca. Seafood and surf-and-turf variations are tasty, too. The restaurant's name means "the nest" and the amusing indoor-outdoor decor is a sort of multiroom aviary with birds singing, chirping, and fluttering all over. Full bar. Or Mama's Platter, cod combined with batter-fried calamari, shrimp, oysters, scallops, and clam strips. Anthony's has been up and running for six decades now, with the buying power to get the pick of the catch. The menu offers 18 different seasonal fish to choose from, plus — if you've got the bread — delicious lob-ster dishes (in season) like lobster thermidor with a creamy, winey sauce. Try to be there at sunset when the water-sky

show will do its darndest to distract you. No reservations. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Moderate. — *EB* (12/05)

The Fish Market 750 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-232-3474. There's something fishy about these crowded, noisy, ever-multiplying restaurants — namely, mesquite-grilled, skewered, steamed, or pankofried seafood, plus piscine chowders, pastas, and salads. Preparations are generally simple and consistent among locations. All the raw seafood is processed at the chain's Northern California facilities, so when the menu refers to a "local" species it merely means it's from somewhere in the Pacific. Small retail fish market in the downtown branch offers slightly fresher products than at most supermarkets. Identical products and dishes are served in the dining room, the ovster bar, and at Top of the Market. But the sushi bar is emphatically the top Fish Market venue, with just-right rice, pristine seafood, and expert preparation. The "Ichiban Hamachi" (also available in the dining rooms) is outstanding — and for a sexy treat, share a pair of "Honeymoon Oysters" with your honey. No reservations, but the space is vast so waits are brief. Restaurant open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. Also in Del Mar at 640 Via de la Valle, 858-755-2277; mini-branch near Fashion Valley, 2401 Fenton Parkway, 619-280-2277. — N.W. (9/01)

Il Fornaio 1333 First Street, Coronado, 619-437-4911. Also at Del Mar Plaza, 1555 Camino Del Mar, Del Mar. 858-755-8876. Il Fornajo's defensive architecture walls it off from the Great Unwashed - the tourists wandering around Coronado's Old Ferry Landing — but it's worth breaching if only to get your teeth into their to-die-for bread. "Il fornaio" means "the baker," after all. Beyond bread, we're talking rustic-feeling, herbal, ultra-fresh salads, and everyday Italian dishes ranging from sfi-latino con bistecchina (thin grilled steak on a baguette with creamy dijon and salad) to a giant mesquite-grilled 22-ounce bistecca alla fiorentina, with lots of vegetarian and pasta dishes in between. A simple penne alla sor-rentina — pasta tubes with a tomato, mozzarella, and basil sauce — is charming. Pizza *puttanesca* is heaven too, if you're into anchovies. Interesting regional menus from different provinces of Italy pop up during the first two weeks of each month. Most staffers seem mind-blowingly knowledgeable. Moderate. — E.B. (1/02)

Man on a Mission

Has his sexism perhaps crossed over from fiction into reality?

orat: Cultural Learnings of America for Make Benefit Glorious Nation of Kazakhstan. Longest film title of the year. Exact same number of words as Once in a Lifetime: The Extraordinary Story of

the New York Cosmos, but, unless I lost count, seventeen more letters. Also the hardest-working and sweatiest film

title of the year, unwilling to delay for an instant the wanton breakage of English. For anyone, like me, who heretofore had never encountered the character on HBO, Borat Sagdiyev will need an introduction. He is one of the personas, my research tells me, of British comedian Sacha Baron Cohen on Da Ali G Show, a Kazakh TV reporter dapperly dressed in a dove-gray suit, bristlingly mustachioed, blissfully sexist, superstitiously anti-Semitic, and not yet toilet-trained (he splashes water on his face from the commode in his New York hotel room, takes a doggy-style dump in the bushes of a public park, jerks off in front of a Victoria's Secret display window, and so on), ostensibly dispatched to America to shoot a documentary for home consumption — a built-in excuse for bad camerawork. A Baywatch re-run on

the hotel television, however, dictates a change in his itinerary, and the purchase of a secondhand ice-cream truck, to enable him to chase his dream of claiming Pamela Anderson for his bride. At least that's the course the

film takes. I don't know what goes on in the HBO show.

Scripted scenes, or at any rate pre-

planned scenes, primarily involving Borat's obese and camera-shy producer, Azamat Bagatov (Ken Davitian), secondarily involving a slightly less obese African-American call girl (Luenell), and presumably also involving the proprietors of a Jewish B&B (how can we be sure?), alternate with unscripted performance-art pieces, so to call them, in which assorted innocents, dupes, patsies, and joke-butts are lured into the gag unawares: a humor coach, an etiquette coach, a trio of feminists, Republican politicos Bob Barr and Alan Keyes, a Middle American TV news team, a rodeo crowd, a Civil War antiques dealer, an RV of inebriated University of South Carolina frat boys, et al., all the way to the climactic meeting with Pamela Anderson at a SoCal book-signing. These unrehearsed bits,



no doubt more compelling, more riveting, more nerve-racking than the planned-out parts, naturally give rise to thoughts of their comedic antecedents and analogues: *Candid Camera*, the practical jokes on a Dick Clark *Bloopers* special, MTV's copycat *Punk'd*, the crank calls of any wisenheimer radio deejay, Andy Kaufman's chauvinist-pig wrestling career, the

Yes Men (and their eponymous film of a couple of years ago), etc. At the same time, they give rise to moral concerns — to say nothing of legal ones — that far overshadow artistic ones. Concerns, that is, about one type of person being given, or taking, precedence over another. Concerns about the rampaging egotist arranging humanity in a hierarchy and installing himself at

the top of the heap. That kind of thing. Can, as an example, an Alabama minister's wife — bluntly insulted for her dearth of pulchritude — be safely assumed to be less of a human being than our fearless guerrilla artiste, or has the latter's sexism perhaps crossed over, there, from fiction into reality? Any diversion afforded by such thoughts is all to the good, because the general

impression of the film, right down to the spottiness of its laughs, and regardless of whether staged or not, is amazingly similar to that of your average Will Ferrell comedy. (Or Rob Schneider. Or David Spade. Or name your SNL alumnus.) In a word, over-the-top and high of the target. Funnily enough, or anyhow fittingly enough, my only prior experience of Sacha Baron Cohen was in the role of the gay French race-car driver in Talladega Nights: The Ballad of Ricky Bobby, an average Will Ferrell comedy with a title of above-average length.

Babel. Communication problems the world over. An American tourist is struck by rifle fire in Morocco, arousing erroneous worries of terrorism. An illegal-alien nanny drags along the two towheads in her care to a Mexican wedding, and runs afoul of the Border Patrol on their return. And a horny pantyless deaf-mute Japanese girl can't get a man, any man, to take an interest in her. These three storylines are fashionably "interlocked" (anyone who can recognize the voice of Brad Pitt over the telephone will immediately know the connection between two of them), and the film strategically ends in the same place, from a different point of view, as it begins, coming full circle. The illusion of complexity, for all that, could scarcely be more transparent. Mexican director Alejandro González Iñárritu, much in the manner of his Amores Perros, achieves depth only in the way that a hero sandwich achieves it; and it achieves length - almost two and a half hours of it — in the same way as a footlong at any Subway shop. Tenuous in construction, slack and sluggish in pace, sketchy and farfetched in plot, the film does nothing

to justify its epic length or its cosmic ambitions. (The Mexican storyline, particularly weak, goes nowhere until it goes bananas: a series of decisions so bad as to forfeit all sympathy for the characters, let alone for the storyteller who compelled the characters to make the decisions.) With a somewhat calmer camera than his norm, however, the director does some nice scene-setting, some impressionistic documentation of the locales, to help realize his goal in sheer duration.

Flushed Away. Animation from the Aardman Studios, not claymation, like their signature Wallace and Gromit series (and not Nick Park directing), but instead compliant, acquiescent computer animation, and a compliantly, acquiescently crasser and cruder sense of humor to go along with it. (Traces of which began to creep into the feature-length Wallace and Gromit outing last year.) The basic plot premise: a housebound tux-wearing pet mouse, in his owner's absence, gets dispossessed by an intrusive sewer rat, literally flushed down the loo, to discover an alternative, miniature London in the underground, plus a feisty feminist mouse, a villainous toad and his toadies, a French-accented frog (get it?), among others. The trademark ping-pong-ball eyes are still in place, although all sign of a human touch in the modelling of the figures has been smoothed out, and the three-dimensionality — the light and shade and all the rest — is blatantly counterfeit, and the total effect is markedly less distinctive. Still, a good deal of skill went into it, in matters of pacing and timing and elementary draftsmanship. Hitting the hero in the nuts in a variety of ways in rapid succession is almost as ingenious as it is low. Almost.

I have just started to notice that the AMC theater chain now tags some of its offerings with the designation "AMC Select," meaning "special films for special tastes." E.g., Running with Scissors, Catch a Fire, Marie Antoinette, Little Miss Sunshine. An objective observer, of course, will have long since reconciled himself to the idea that the taste of the ghoul and the ninny will be the taste of the mass, the mainstream, the middle of the road. No cautionary note of "special" need be attached to the likes of Saw III and Jackass Number Two. Come one, come all. Wherever an element of evaluation enters the picture, however, there will always be room for dispute, as when something like Flags of Our Fathers is excluded from the ranks of the "special" and lumped in with such unesoteric fare as Employee of the Month and Texas Chainsaw Massacre: The Beginning. If "special tastes" are understood to be finicky tastes, discriminating tastes, refined tastes, as opposed to merely quirky tastes, minority tastes, oddball tastes, then they can hardly be guaranteed satisfaction by surrendering to AMC's guidance.

The lampposts of Little Italy, more honestly an Itsy-Bitsy Italy, have been adorned with vertical banners in tribute to prominent Italian-Americans. The one at the northwest corner of Fir and India, a block from the *Reader* offices, honors the household-name movie director, "Martin Scorese." That's what it says. "Scorese."

The Black Dahlia — James Ellrov's the-

ory of the case — the unsolved murder, disembowelment, and bisection of Hollywood wannabe Elizabeth Short in 1947 — as expounded in 325 dense pages of fiction, fitted on screen into the film noir boilerplate: the laconic first-person narration of a twofisted cop (Josh Hartnett), the moody solo trumpet of Mark Isham in the background, and a blonde and brunette brace of femmes fatales (Scarlett Johansson, Hilary Swank). Brian De Palma, the director, has never had much grasp of narrative, and here the tangle so overwhelms him that he neglects even his baroque stylistics. A complicated piece of slo-mo action, akin to his Potemkin plagiarism in *The Untouchables*, is not only unpersuasive in its staging, but fails to conceal the identity of the killer despite going to great pains (short of cheating with a stand-in) to do so. The highlight, if there must be one, would probably be K.D. Lang's rendition of "Love for Sale" in a subterranean lesbian nightclub. A lower but steadier light comes from the nice waxy sheen of Vilmos Zsigmond's cinematography. With Aaron Eckhart, Mia Kirshner, Fiona Shaw. 2006.

Catch a Fire — Sympathy for the terrorist. Not, heaven forbid, the Islamic terrorist, but the South African terrorist *circa* 1980, the hard-working family man who, falsely accused of terrorism, turns to terrorism for real. Parallels to other sorts of ter-

rorists can be drawn all the same, and that would be the only avenue of bravery in this sanctimonious rehash of the evils of apartheid. The drumming-up of suspense proves to be no less grindingly mechanical than the drumming-up of sympathy. This is the Phillip Noyce of Rabbit-Proof Fence (not a compliment) rather than of The Quiet American or Heatwaye or even Patriot Games. Warmly photographed, nonetheless, by Ron Fortunato and Garry Phillips, and warmly played, at times hotly, by Derek Luke and Bonnie Henna. Tim Robbins, the anti-terrorist Afrikaner, is stereotypically stone-cold. 2006. ★ (HORTON PLAZA 14)

Clue — A new source of movie material: the Parker Brothers board game of the same name. (What's next? A big-scale production of Risk, with a cast of thousand and nonstop action?) Of course this particular board game was based, in the first place, on the Mary Roberts Rinehart branch of the detective novel, soundly precedented on screen, with its Old Dark House, thunderstorm, dinner-party cast of characters, etc. The McCarthy Era timeperiod, though it may be ancient history to some, thus seems a bit too contemporary, and the accompanying political comment a bit indigestible. But then, the impatient hunt for laughs often takes the movie a bit off track, and the traditional long-winded summation (delivered by Tim Curry) goes over like the proverbial lead balloon. It seems unlikely that the gimmick of three different endings, available at different outlets, is going to tempt many patrons into return visits. (Berg, seeking indignation, not understanding, often manages to get stray children into the same frame with the man), is a coup too big for a mere 60 Minutes segment, a mere slice of the 20/20 pie, although her technique is pure TV. And there's a powerful outpouring of emotion from the Japanese father of one of the victims, wanting to substitute the word "rape' for "molestation." All in all, a rough time for Cardinal Roger Mahony in particular (seen mostly in deposition video) and the Catholic Church in general, with the singular exception of a dissident priest and justice-seeker by the name of Father Tom Dovle. 2006.

The Departed — Martin Scorsese's career-changing turn to the overblown epic, a turn marked by Casino, would seem to be a course difficult to reverse. Kundun ... Gangs of New York ... The Aviator And now even a trashy light diversion, adapted from an average-length Hong Kong action film, will get dragged out to two and a half hours - this despite the delivery of dialogue at the machine-gun tempo of a hopped-up auctioneer (or of Scorsese's own casual conversation), and despite, too, the mere semblance of speed imparted by the free-associative cutting and the incongruous rockabilly beat of the background music, whenever the filmmaker isn't trotting out his collection of rock-and-roll oldies. The convoluted plot verges on farce: an upwardly mobile underworld spy in the Massachusetts State Police (Matt Damon, raising his eyebrows in an ostentatious show of innocence) and a downwardly mobile police spy inside the mob (Leonardo DiCaprio, giving himself away with his meat-cleaver worry line) both become involved, first as clients and then as suitors, with a Harper's Bazaar idea of a psychotherapist (Vera Farmiga, she of the prow-like cheekbones, life-raft lips, blue-lagoon eyes). Not even the take-no-prisoners crescendo of gore toward the end, jolting though some of it is, can pull the movie back from the farcical brink. And Jack Nicholson, as showy an actor as Scorsese is a director (when he's only in it for the money, anyway), plays the mob boss at a pitch barely below his Batman Joker. 

still hoping for a sixth installment of Dirty Harry, is plainly not yet done paying penance for the casual, callous, and prolific violence of his earlier years. And this elegiac war film makes an essential, an unmissable, piece of the entire cycle, an extraordinary course of self-examination and self-reform, beginning in earnest with the aptly titled Unforgiven, continuing through A Perfect World and, yes, The Bridges of Madison County — the modern-day saddle tramp riding a pickup instead of a pony and shooting with a camera instead of a Colt and, after slacking off for a few lesser efforts, carrying on with revived urgency through Mystic River and Million Dollar Baby. Once again, as in Bridges, opting for the camera as a weapon of choice, he tells the story of the famous Joe Rosenthal flagraising photograph from the Battle of Iwo Jima — the full story, how this flag was in actuality a larger replacement flag for one raised already, how the battle raged on for five more weeks afterwards (contrary to the 1949 Sands of Iwo Jima with John Wayne), how the three survivors among the six faceless flag-raisers (played with great restraint by Ryan Phillippe, Adam Beach, Jesse Bradford) were brought back home to be paraded around on a bond drive, how they squirmed under the banner of "the heroes of Iwo Iima" (the best-known of them, the American Indian Ira Hayes, later celebrated in song by Johnny Cash and Bob Dylan, drank himself into an irreversible skid), how they lived out their remaining days. It

is distinctly a film of, and for, its own time, gripped with the conviction that the more you know about an event, the more tainted it will get. (And let's remind ourselves here that Eastwood is the only major filmmaker to have commemorated on screen the American conquest of Grenada. Surely some special penance was owed for that. Mark it down as paid in full.) The central theme of the manufacture and marketing of "heroes," while timeless in its application to the everyday work of Hollywood, has a particular topicality in the post-9/11 world where no one in public service seems to be able to do his job anymore without being branded a hero. The point — that men are only men, that "heroes" are their creations, a label pinned on them like ribbons — is quietly and forcefully made. Yet despite its best efforts, or rather because of them, the film inescapably demonstrates the existence of heroes in the real world. One such, obviously, would be Eastwood himself, a shining example of the human capacity for growth and renewal. He, too, shoots with a camera. 2006.





49 Up — Timely bulletin from Michael Apted on the motley Brits he has been checking in on, at seven-year intervals, ever since they were seven years old. It would be easy for the American moviegoer, introduced to them three movies ago at the age of twenty-eight, to have become blasé about the matter. It would be only a little more difficult for him to marvel anew at the uniqueness of the project, even to lament that other filmmakers in other countries never thought to copy it. Although there is hardly a whole movie's worth of new material in it. Apted has done an expert job of shuffling in the old material, filling in each step of the journey, so that even a newcomer to the series might feel at home. New developments - new iobs, new relationships, new kids - are minimal; and histrionics, outside of some general grumbles from the participants about the periodic imposition of the camera and one specific threat to discontinue,



The Illusionist — Ponderous amplification of a Steven Millhauser short story about a thaumaturge in turn-of-the-century Vienna (a fiercely scowling if not terribly intimidating Edward Norton), arrested on stage in the film's first scene and fast start. There follows a tedious childhood flashback to a forbidden friendship across class barriers and a clichéd shot of clutching fingertips poignantly pulled apart. The separated friends are destined to meet again in adulthood when Crown Prince Leopold (Rufus Sewell with a joke-shop mustache) volunteers his presumptive fiancée as a pigeon in the magic act, whereupon the magician immediately recognizes his long-lost sweetheart (Jessica Biel), while she fails to return the favor, perhaps because of his beard or perhaps because he has aged at twice the rate. The entire story, until at long last it makes its way back to its starting point, is ostensibly told to the Crown Prince by the Chief of Police (the unprepossessing Paul Giamatti), including information he couldn't know or wouldn't share. Questions of whether the magician's powers are supernatural or just prestidigital cannot be answered without Plot Spoilers, or Bean Spillers, though it's fair to say they are answered with trivial tricksiness. Little Miss Sunshine — The feature debut of music-video veterans Jonathan Day-

ton and his wife Valerie Faris was put together on the "quirky" assembly line, a product of the thriving "quirky" industry Dad (Greg Kinnear) is a would-be self-help guru, "would-be," that is, if anyone were buying his Nine-Step Refuse-to-Lose System. Sample pearl, in casual conversation: "Sarcasm is the refuge of losers." Mom (Toni Collette) is not such an arrant embarrassment, is not really much of anything, except that she has taken responsibility for and custody of her homosexual brother (Steve Carell), a failed suicide and the self-professed, as opposed to acknowledged, "pre-eminent Proust scholar in the United States." Dad's dad (Alan Arkin), who resides in the same household, is a scurrilous cokehead. And the kids are a Nietzsche-reading teenage boy (Paul Dano) who has held fast to a vow of silence for nine months, though he is not averse to communication via notepad ("I hate everyone"), and an owlishly bespectacled vounger sister (Abigail Breslin) in competition for the crown of Little Miss Sunshine in Redondo Beach. Since the family lives in Albuquerque, a road movie ensues, with all members of the family packed into a yellow-and-white VW bus. You wait with dread for the moment that will cause the boy to break his silence, and even greater dread for the first public performance of the girl's "talent" as nurtured in secret by Granddad: and the dread in each case proves fully justified. Quirkiness does not preclude sappiness. There are ample compensations, however. Little Miss Breslin is a good crier, and her competitors in the beauty pageant are a frightening collection of JonBenét Ramsey plastic dolls, and the bus itself emerges as the best character, requiring a collective push after the clutch goes out en route, and emitting a rudesounding, unpredictable bleat after the horn gets stuck. 2006.

Looking for Comedy in the Muslim World — Albert Brooks, director, writer, star, returns to top form, and for the first time since his first film, Real Life, literally portrays "himself," though one would hope not altogether accurately. The idea of the film is self-evidently an inspired one. The U.S. State Department, hoping to win the hearts and minds of the Muslim peoples by better understanding their sense of humor, recruits a "respected" comedian to travel to India and Pakistan for one month and to write up a 500-page report on his findings with no remuneration beyond the Medal of Freedom and its tricolor ribbon. And, too, "You'd be doing your country a great service." The idea is a good one not only as an entry, albeit tangential and superficial, to the subject of the War on Terror, but even more so as an entry, and a deep one, into the subject of Albert Brooks, a way for him to confront the bugaboos of his spotty career, the cruel truth that many people (Muslims, doubtless, but Gentiles, Jews, too, merrymaking Americans of all stripes) do not find him funny and many others do not even know who he is. To the extent that the idea affords Brooks a way to confront such bugaboos, it equally affords him a way to prove his bravery, notwithstanding his demurral at the illegal border-crossing into Pakistan: "I've never been known for bravery." He always ought to have been. He should surely be hereafter. It could no doubt be alleged that the limitation of all of Brooks's films, and this one no exception, is his obsessive concern with self and little else. But in mitigation it could be answered that the other principal characters on display, while few in number and not deeply probed, are astutely cast and played: John Carroll Lynch and Jon Tenney as the stolid, imperturbable State Department flunkies assigned as chaperones, and Sheetal Sheth as the endearingly enthusiastic but uncomprehending Hindu amanuensis. The further, the deeper mitigation of Brooks's selfconcern is of course his self-satire. If he spends most of his time looking at and into himself (instead of for comedy in the Muslim world), at least he's not satisfied with what he sees. 2006



The boy's second home is no sta bler, a pink-painted monstrosity that accommodates a haggard hausfrau who never misses a day of Dark Shadows and snacks on dog kibble; two nubile daughters, one coquettishly virginal and one candidly tarty; a cat named Freud; a perennial Christmas tree in the parlor; a never-diminishing pile of dishes in the kitchen; the doctor's private sanctuary known self-explanatorily as his "masturbatorium"; and a trail of neurotic clients prominently including a brooding predatory homosexual. The basic assumption, trendy and trite as can be, is that the more eccentric, the more lunatic the vision of family life, the more truthful and insightful, the more relevant and revealing, it must be. (And never mind how tortuous the route to a punch line: the sole purpose of the dragged-out practical

joke of a cat-meat stew is to enable the humorless homosexual to huff off with an "I don't eat pussy!") Annette Bening, whose presence tends to point up the kinship with American Beauty, puts on quite a show as the biological mother, running the gamut from the irrepressibly tempestuous ("Get the rage on the page, women," she rails at her fledgling poets' circle) to the chemically tranquillized, with nary a misstep along the way. This is a portrait which, floridness notwithstanding, remains recognizably and humorously human. In most of the rest, the floridness overgrows and obscures. animation. As so often in that medium, the aesthetic plane, quite distinct from the financial plane, is not sufficiently higher than that of Mr. Potatohead. The hero, Jack Skellington, a/k/a The Pumpkin King, looks unfortunately like Whitley Strieber's extraterrestrial in a pinstripe suit and on stilts. And his many, varied, and grotesque cohorts are first and foremost a manifestation of Hollywood's besetting vices of overabundance and overindulgence: too many, too varied, too grotesque. Another, more basic, manifestation of these is the mere fact that the film is a feature and not a short. Because it is a Disney film, of course, and an animated film, there seems to be some immutable law that it must have songs, songs,

and more songs — written (and some of them sung) by Danny Elfman, but sounding more like Andrew Lloyd Webber in search of a melody ("I don't believe what's happening to me,/ My hopes, my dreams, my fantasy!"). These musical interludes are no doubt the greatest offenders in the torture-rack stretch to feature-length, but the gaudy displays of wealth and expenditure run them a close second. In its bare bones, the premise seems viable enough. Completely separate towns, according to Burton's fantasyland geography, are responsible for planning and carrying-off the separate holidays on the calendar, until one year the Halloween mastermind gets it into his head to abduct Santa Claus and usurp

Christmas. There is some dark-toned fun (not darker than TV's The Simpsons or than Charles Addams's New Yorker cartoons and not more fun, either) when the revised Christmas plans begin to go awry. And by and by there's a traditional and respectable fairy-tale message to do with accepting yourself as you are. The delivery of that message, however, and for that matter the setting-up of the basic premise, are garbled in the extreme. One does not envy parents who must try to explain the thing to their young. 1993.



Le llegó la hora

Un tribunal iraquí condenó el domingo a Saddam Hussein y otros dos funcionarios de su régimen a morir en la horca por crímenes contra la humanidad, cerrando un triste capítulo en la historia del país pero suscitando temores de un recrudecimiento de la violencia.

Algunos grupos de chiítas y curdos estallaron de júbilo al conocer el fallo, pero temían represalias de la insurgencia sunitas. En una audiencia judicial televisada, Saddam fue condenado a muerte por crímenes de lesa humanidad al ser declarado culpable de la muerte de 148 personas en la población chiíta de Dujail en 1982.

El Alto Tribunal iraquí también declaró culpa-

bles y condenó a muerte a su medio hermano y ex jefe de la inteligencia Barzan Ibrahim, y a Awad Hamed al-Bandar, titular de la Corte Revolucionaria. Otros tres acusados recibieron condenas más leves, y uno fue absuelto. Al escuchar la sentencia, el ex gobernante iraquí exclamó tembloroso: "Dios es grande".

"Viva el pueblo y mueran sus enemigos. Viva la nación gloriosa y mueran sus enemigos", gritó Hussein con un estremecimiento evidente mientras oía el veredicto.

El de Hussein se trató de uno de los juicios más importantes en el mundo desde el proceso en los tribunales de Nuremberg a miembros del régimen nazi de Adolfo Hitler.



Son ingeniosos

El ingenio para cruzar la frontera ha llevado a intrépidos inmigrantes a valerse de camionetas pintadas como vehículos oficiales de la Patrulla Fronteriza o de bicicletas para burlar la vigilancia en el desierto de Arizona. Gustavo Soto, vocero

de la Patrulla Fronteriza sector Tusón, dijo que aproximadamente cada mes los agentes fronterizos se encuentran con 10 a 15 casos de personas que utilizan bicicletas para cruzar la frontera de los Estados Unidos.

"Es un vehículo que les permite recorrer una mayor distancia en menos tiempo y dejar menos huellas", explicó.

Según Soto, la agencia federal no lleva registro del número de indocumentados que utiliza este medio para cruzar la frontera, pero indicó que frecuentemente se encuentran bicicletas tiradas en medio del desierto, algunas en pésimas condiciones.

"Algunas veces las bicicletas se encuentran en tan malas condiciones, prácticamente destrozadas que los indocumentados prefieren dejarlas", dijo.

Los indocumentados utilizan también las bicicletas porque despiertan menos "sospechas" por parte de residentes del área y de los mismos agentes de la Patrulla Fronteriza.

- In September, the headmistress of the Dvergsnes primary school in Kristiansand, Norway, proposed that boys be taught to urinate while seated, in order to reduce splashing and mis-targeting, which burden the cleaning staff, but many parents and politicians reacted bitterly. Said Vidar Kleppe of the Justice and Order party, "It's a human right [for a boy] not to have to sit down like a girl," adding that the school was "fiddling with God's work." Parent Nancy Bakke was proud of her seven-year-old boy's ability to aim: "This rule goes against everything I've tried to teach my son.'

Can't Possibly Be True

 Youth cheerleading coach Christine Smith was dismissed in September by the Frederick (Md.) Youth Sports Association for a sideline gesture she said was to re-energize her seven- and eight-year-old girls when their football team fell behind. Smith drew a smiley face on her stomach, which she said they found "hilarious," but allegedly three people complained of the unseemliness of Smith's lifting her shirt slightly to show the face. Said association president Kathy Carey, "Pulling your shirt up is...not what our organization is about."

- Akira Haraguchi, 60, spent 16 straight hours on Oct. 4 reciting the value of pi from memory to 100,000 decimal places, breaking his old record of 83,431. Haraguchi, whose day job is psychiatric counselor, performed in front of officials at a public hall in Kisarazu, Japan, and rattled off the numbers continuously except for a five-minute break every hour. (In 2002, two University of Tokyo mathematicians, using a supercomputer, calculated pi to 1.24 trillion decimal places.)

 Civilization in Decline: (1) In October, Britain's public health minister said she had been warned by counselors that some pregnant teenagers were purposely smoking in order to make their babies smaller so that childbirth would be less painful. (2) Australia's Herald Sun reported in September that a Target store in Melbourne was selling padded "bralettes" from the child clothing and doll manufacturer Bratz Babyz, aimed at children aged six to ten.

Inexplicable

Government air-travel rules against carryon knives, guns, cigarette lighters, and other potential weapons should be well known by now, but airports continue to report almost widespread ignorance (or forgetfulness) by travelers. The Boston Globe reported in September that screeners at Logan International Airport confiscated about 12,000 items a week before the August 2006 restrictions drove more travelers to check their bags. Every few weeks, Logan officials take about a ton of confiscated items to a warehouse in Concord, N.H., where bargain-hunters buy them for pennies on the dollar.

- În August, about a dozen masked men lugged six 40-gallon trash bags full of sauce packets into the Taco Bell on South Western Avenue in Marion, Ind., leaving a note explaining that they had been accumulating them for a while and decided to give them back. They suspected they had 25,000 packets. (Taco Bell said it hands out about 6 billion a vear.)

Campaign Roundup

Adult video star Mary Carey, once again running for governor of California, said she is a new person from the woman who was an alsoran in 2003: "I've got brown in my hair [she was blond in 2003] because brunettes are taken more seriously." She said she also has lost weight, replaced her teeth, gotten breast implants, and given up smoking, contraceptives, and alcohol. "I've actually been sober for five days now," she said on Aug. 9.

• (1) West Virginia state senator Randy White decided in October to remain in the race for reelection despite the surfacing of photographs taken two years earlier of White nude except for body paint, in a group of similarly decorated men. White said he had had a "personal identification situation." (2) After a reporter for Minnesota's Rochester Post-Bulletin noticed similarities in expression between mayoral candidate Pat Carr and a pseudonymous supporter who posted message after message of praise of Carr on the newspaper's website, Carr admitted that the "supporter" was actually himself. Said Carr, "I stand by what I [wrote]."

· Lorenzo Martin, 34, was charged with domestic violence in September, accused of holding his estranged wife's leg in a bed of fire ants, resulting in more than 100 bites (Cottonwood, Ala.). ... Mary Kay Gray, 58, was charged in September with shooting her husband in the shoulder in retaliation for his allegedly having shot and killed Mary's favorite chicken (Cheshire, Ore.). ... Spiritual counselor Nickie Marks said he was contemplating a lawsuit in September after the town of Greensboro, Ga., confiscated the half-ton statue of Jesus from his front yard (based on a zoning ordinance banning wordless signs, originally intended to keep business owners from welding cars to the tops of poles).

Least Competent Criminals

 Audacious: (1) A 37-year-old man was charged with burglary in Waterbury, Conn., in September after he was caught selling the victim's distinctive furnishings at a yard sale just a few doors down the street. (2) Christopher Bordne, 17, was arrested in September in Newton, Mass., after a police officer, waiting behind Bordne at a traffic light at 1:40 a.m. through several light changes, checked to find Bordne with his foot on the brake but otherwise sound asleep. After yelling at Bordne and rapping repeatedly on the window with his flashlight, the officer watched as Bordne woke up, drove off, and crashed into a tree.

Two unnamed Egyptian men in their 20s, in Russia on tourist visas, illegally crossed the border to Belarus and then headed to Poland, which, as a European Union country, is harder to enter.

According to an August report from BBC News' Moscow bureau, the pair dug a hole under the border (using shoehorns), and once in Poland, intended to enter Germany the same way, but they had gotten turned around during the dig and instead of Germany, they mistakenly tunneled back into Belarus, where they were captured. They were sent back to Moscow but later were trying to leave the country again when Russian guards at the Ukraine border took them into custody.

Two "News of the Weird" old-timers made the news recently: H. Beatty Chadwick, jailed for contempt of court in 1995 for failure to hand over assets to his ex-wife after their divorce (because he claims not to have control of them) has now passed day 4100 in a county lockup outside Philadelphia, according to an ABC News report. ... Massachusetts inmate Michelle Kosilek, who was Robert Kosilek when he went to prison, is now awaiting a federal court decision on whether the prison system must fund the final-step surgery in his gender switch. Kosilek says being trapped in a man's body is agonizing: "The greatest loss is the dying I do inside a little bit every day." (Kosilek's wife, though, did all her dying at once, when Robert murdered her in 1990.)

(1) In September, a youth-sports association raffle in Weaverville, N.C., offered an Uzi submachine gun as a prize for a while, until the association responded to complaints and stopped it. (2) Underachieving former St. Thomas Law School (Miami) student Thomas Bentey filed a federal class action lawsuit against the school in August, alleging that it knew when it accepted him that he couldn't muster the necessary 2.5 grade-point average to stay in school and thus defrauded him.





Dear Saffron,

Her brother has a sleepover that night at a friend's house, so he can't watch Maggie, and the truth (which sis-in-law admitted later in the conversation) is she doesn't want to bother to get a sitter so she asked Maggie to the dinner. I am really fond of my niece, but these dinners have always been nice, relaxing, kid-free meals, where everyone has martinis and adult conversation. I am not bringing my daughters. Now, if I say "no" to this request, which is what I'm inclined to do, it will hurt Maggie's feelings, plus my sister-inlaw will be mad. But if I say "yes," there goes the nice adult dinner I was so looking forward to. I wish my sister-in-law had brought the question up to me before she mentioned it to Maggie. How do I handle this?

ABOUT TO TURN 40 IN VISTA

Dear About to Turn 40,

Your sister-in-law should have consulted you before she dangled the possibility of coming to dinner in front of her daughter. Now you have an uncomfortable choice — have the type of evening you'd like but disappoint your niece or sacrifice your preference for a grown-up occasion in order to spare Maggie's feelings. You could insist on sticking to the original plan, but my favored strategy is that you bite the bullet and change the tone of the festivities. Allow Maggie to attend, and invite your daughters, too. Afterward, let your sister-in-law know that she needs to consult you first in a situation like this so that you're not placed in the position of having to contemplate barring your lovely niece, or anyone else, from a celebration.

Dear Saffron,

I'm a bit behind on my reading your articles, so I'm online getting caught up on your responses to conundrums that people have posed. Just got done reading your February 9, 2006, article addressing the 80-year-old woman who is snoring through the opera. I agree she might consider a matinee version of her favorite operas, but there is another, more complicated issue that may have come up in this woman's life. She may be suffering with obstructive sleep apnea, which causes most sufferers to fall asleep in the most inappropriate places during the day. One symptom of apnea is heavy snoring, but that isn't the only issue at hand. If this woman does have apnea, her health is at risk at her advanced age. I've been recently diagnosed with apnea and have had it for many years, but because I don't meet the insurance companies' criteria for the condition (obesity and age), they've never paid for the treatment. Common to sufferers is that they do not get a full night's sleep as their body and mind fight to make certain they are breathing while asleep. Heavy snoring isn't necessarily a sign of apnea, but her physician sure should check it out. It can be hazardous and is a very difficult malady for many physicians to diagnose if they aren't aware of it. Sleep clinics abound in San Diego; I was diagnosed by one several years ago...they found that I was having 15 apnea occurrences per hour. That is 15 times per hour that my body shuts

down the supply of air to my lungs, and the mind never gets the full amount of sleep — thus a constant tiredness during the day. There are more serious complications that arise, relating to heart conditions...it's treatable and is far more common than many people think. While my apnea occurrences are considered mild, there are people that have been diagnosed as having 100 and more apnea occurrences per hour. Just thought I'd share this info with you in case you ever run into it again.

Botswana

INTO THE BUSH — PART 1

Maun is in the north of Botswana and is the capital of Ngamiland. The last 500 kilometers of tarred road arrived in the early 1990s. It has a reputation of a frontier town and a growing list of colorful characters. Some of the old hunters are legends in their own time, although they are a dying breed of rugged individuals. They could take care of themselves and others in any situation. They were often isolated and operated in harsh environments that were hard on people and equipment.

In the Maun safari industry some of the famous hunters I have met are Lionel Palmer, Dougie Wright, John Dugmore, Willy Phillips, and Harry Selby. These men are great story tellers and, in their day, were sought after by clients. For an indepth sense of their life and times I recommend a book about Harry Selby called *Horn of the Hunter* by Robert Ruark. It is a classic, true African hunting story.

Charlie is a friend of mine. Several years ago, we shared a house. He is a hard-drinking, ebullient, funny man. An opportunity for a two-day trip into the bush with Charlie is not something to pass up. He wants to go toward Moremi Game Reserve for a couple of nights and invites me along. I accept. A trip with Charlie is well known in town as a guaranteed adventure. Maybe even better than Steinbeck's Travels with Charley.

We shop for supplies in the morning, fill up with diesel, have a quick lunch, and head toward Moremi. The trip in is surprisingly smooth. We have seen some game — giraffes, kudu, and impala. Before we find our camp, I spot a brown

hyena. It is lying up to the neck in water and mud. The hyena is waiting for some game to come down for a drink. It is disturbed enough by us that it gets up and slinks away. Supper is eaten and there is a full moon shining. After sharing some stories, Charlie goes to sleep on top of the Land Rover. I sit in front of the tent and have a nightcap.

We break camp at 8:30 and start following the watery perimeter of the delta south of Moremi. Charlie has this customized '68 Land Rover that he calls Sally. When the going gets rough or the sand gets soft, he gives her all the encouragement he can. We are moving through and over bush, like the elephants we encounter. Before lunch and some rough going, where we have to go back, around, and through some rough terrain, it happens.

Sally has almost gotten us out of the heavy going, when a slight miscalculation puts her down. We are out of the vehicle looking at the two wheels on the passenger side. They are in a water hole made by elephants, with the

weight of Sally resting on her undercarriage. Charlie starts to swear, gets out the 30kg jack, and goes to work on the front wheel. I am watching out for lions and elephants, gathering branches to put under the tires.

Charlie becomes demonlike, and the air becomes purple. The jack is not in top mechanical shape. Twenty minutes of jacking the front



end results in us getting the jack stuck in the mud. The two of us pulling, slipping, staggering, and cursing finally break the suction and get it free. Charlie turns to me and says, "Well, Dave, at least when we are doing this, we are not doing anything else."

We move to the rear

wheels, which appear to have a more severe tilt than the front — the other back tire isn't even touching the ground. I continue to collect wood, and Charlie continues to swear at the jack because it won't go up or down. Looking at the angle of Sally's resting spot and the amount of water and the sizes of the holes, I'm not too optimistic. I'm thinking we may be

> spending the night here, or longer.

Charlie's expansive Yorkshire vocabulary is down to three words. I've collected wood and am taking a smoke break. Charlie quiets when the jack starts working again. I jam some of the wood under the back wheel and it all but disap-

pears into the mud. Then the jack starts to slip sideways. The next thing I see is Sally sliding uphill! Sally is tilting on a 30-degree angle, sliding uphill. Darnedest thing I'd seen in a long time. We get inside and drive away, amazed at our good fortune.





Shortly after I wrote the last post for this blog, I got a call from my sister in Rome. Dad wasn't doing very well - he was having difficulty breathing and moving about. Could I make plans to return as soon as possible? A week or so after this phone call, a week during which Dad was put through a series of what must have seemed to him debilitating medical tests to determine the nature of his malady, we had the diagnosis: advanced-stage emphysema.

I wasn't particularly surprised at the news — after all, the man chain-smoked his way through every single day of the past 80 years, and he's only 76. So, no surprise, but lots of alarm and dismay.

It wasn't really a question of: will he survive? I knew the answer to that — of course he wouldn't: 20 years ago I'd read the Doors' bio and had concluded that they were right, that no one gets out alive. I wasn't going to joust with the inevitable. No, the real question was: over the next 15, 20, 30, 50 short years that remained of his life, would Dad somehow recuperate his appreciation for pasta, pizza, and bread? Because that is what emphysema did to him: it made him abhor many of the foods that he formerly loved. Questo si che e' triste!

Our family started to pick up on the change in Dad's diet pref-



erences a couple of years back. Out of nowhere he started to refuse to eat primi. Mom'd spend the entire day making what she thought was his favorite dish, pasta al forno, only to have him stare at it. She'd make him steaming plates of tagliatelle and tortellini, but he'd only eat half a bite, then blow up his cheeks and distend his stomach as if he'd just finished off the entire quadruped population of a bovine factory farm.

At first she thought he might have acid reflux. Then she thought he might have developed some food allergies and encouraged him to see a doctor. This, too, was to no avail, because Dad is allergic to doctors.

Finally, a family meeting was convened. The four of us — Mom, Thomas, Fay, and I examined the facts: he wouldn't eat pasta or pizza or bread or crackers; no fruit, few veggies, and since Fiorentinas were still banned, little meat. He was starting to lose weight. Only one conclusion could be drawn from these facts: he missed the States. He hadn't been back in a couple of years, we flawlessly reasoned, and his refusal to eat pasta and



pizza amounted to a silent protest against a family system that would keep him stuck in the land of spaghetti, far from his beloved land of steakhouses. (Never mind that at his age he's still fiercely independent and fully capable of making any trip he chooses.)

In the space of a very few minutes, we had walloped ourselves into one of the biggest, fiercest

guilt-trips ever attempted - and had pulled it off admirably. (Conveniently, it hadn't occurred to the four of us to ask Dad for his opinion — supposedly because he has always been so

> mulishly private in the face of our meddlesomeness. Also conveniently, we overlooked Dad's telling habit of wheezing and hacking because he'd been wheezing and hacking forever: we are a family that refuses to truck with anything as convenient as the obvious).

Anyway, we arranged a trip back to the States for him and, when he arrived, tried to mainline him with

enough T-bones, porterhouses, and filet mignons to make him start to moo. It was at this mooing juncture that we figured it opportune to reintroduce pasta into his diet. Unfortunately, the reintroduction was a failure after a mere forkful of gnocchi he blew out his cheeks and distended his stomach and started to undulate like those pastramisandwich-eating guys in the Tums commercials.

Okay, so he no longer likes pasta or pizza — there are worse things, we whispered to each other. Not many worse things, mind you, but worse things.

It turns out that this negative reaction to carbs is a common symptom of advanced emphysema. When Dad was diagnosed, my sister Fay, a champion chainsmoker and a total spaghettihead, reduced her smoking to half a carton a day. Mom went from a pack to half a pack. (Thomas and I quit years ago, so our relationship to all things doughy remains as tight and uncorrupted as ever).

I'm pleased to report that Dad hasn't smoked a cigarette in over two months and, although he remains highly allergic to doctors, he nevertheless faithfully maintains his appointments with his pneumologo. In fact, he only hacked into the phone once for a brief 30 seconds when I spoke to him on Monday, so some improvement is already evident.

Generally, I'm optimistic. One day, soon, he may well be able to sit in front of a huge plate of pasta al forno and eat heartily once again. And if he does start to blow out his cheeks, distend his stomach, and undulate it won't be because of emphysema, but because of heartburn. Heartburn I can handle, I'm less adept at handling heartbreak.







What really puts the God in TGIF? Crappy jobs, of course. The Lowardaah...works in the shadow of sufferngaah...and the kingdom and the glory that is Far-Ry-Dayaah...would verily be cast down among those weepingaah and them gnashing theyah teethaah...yea and those rending theyah garmentsaah!

My roommate, for example, has a job that visibly sucks the life from him. He returns from his telemarketing job (and not a fraudulent one, as those things go) a shadow of the man who set off at 5 a.m.. On weekend nights he is to be a rock-and-roll player, but by Friday afternoon has been pummeled into Perry Como on Haldol. My close personal friend, sometimes assistant and photographer, the Specialist, is a waitress all week, works Friday lunch at a popular La Jolla watering hole. She seems none the worse for wear on Friday nights, until she starts drooling on my shoulder during an 8 p.m. staging of Triple Espresso, while I'm laughing my gosh-darn head off.

I have an easy job, I admit it, but this was not always so. I figure I have, in the karmic layout of the big picture, paid my dues and deserve a job I can do in my underwear. Preferably on Saturday or Sunday afternoon well after the butler has cleared the brunch trays. I have labored in the fields, and I have the old union cards to show for it. The worst of them was for a job similar to my roommate's present job. I did it for one day so I could write about it, and not for the money. I called the outfit DisInfo Tel because of a nondisclosure agreement I had signed that was supposed to cover the sleazy hustle at the heart of the enterprise.

My first job, not counting paperboy, was washing dishes at age 14 at Bob's Kitchen in Grayslake, Illinois. I learned to smoke Camels. My father, intent on getting me back into the newspaper business, suggested I apply for a job at the Grayslake Leak, or whatever it was, where I landed a position bundling papers off the press with fist-scarring wires. Meanwhile, I was already getting paid \$20 to \$40 on weekends playing bass guitar for the Swordsmen at high school and church dances. My subsequent career at the Piggly Wiggly in Mundelein, Illinois, as frozen-food manager is still under investigation, and I am not disposed to discuss it until Sara Lee drops the charges or links me with solid evidence to the phasing out of their line of brownies. Yes, I miss them too, but they never proved a thing.

These would later be wrapped with copper wire for the center of the speaker cone. Even with the mask, the glue in the enclosed space would zone me out nicely, and well before lunch I would be laughing and joke with the little purple sidemen who accompanied me on boss originals I would later introduce to the band (then, the Experimental Blues) at rehearsal at night. We had two sets of complexly arranged originals all in 3/4 time within three weeks.

That gig ended when I took five with Bubba, my imaginary purple keyboard player, and lit up a Lark (I read that John Lennon smoked them). The glue lit like napalm, and the booth went up in a whoof you could hear in Wisconsin. I was looking for work again, but without eyebrows. I still had shoulder-length hair, however, and at Rockford Foundries I got a job melting down 40-pound flywheels over a vat of molten zinc. On the other side of the vat, manning the slag chute, was a completely hairless moron called Moose. Moose was supposed to yell "Slag!" when he shoved a load down the chute so that I could step away from the splash; but Moose thought it was far more hilarious to yell "Slag!" while the molten zinc was raining in a three-foot radius around the vat.

For the next month I played college concerts with crutches. I couldn't even sit on a stool onstage because the top of my right foot was healing over with a

skin-graft patch from my ass. I was some kind of cool in my African dashiki, Hendrix Afro, gold lamé pants, no eyebrows, and crutches. But I had two stacks of brand new Showmen from workers' comp money, while Moose collected unemployment.
