Rocking the voters It's no secret that this fall's election season didn't go smoothly for San Diego Registrar of Voters **Mikel Haas**. First came news that some 5000 absentee ballots,

ordered from controversial evoting vendor Diebold Election Systems, failed to arrive, forcing workers to send out photocopies of the ballot to irate voters. Once returned, votes cast on each ballot had to be transcribed by hand onto forms to be run through the

Registrar's optical scanners, further delaying an already late tally. Then on election day complaints piled up about things like Diebold's voting machines breaking down or being plugged into electrical outlets without juice. But that may be only the tip of the iceberg.

Based on recent e-mails obtained from the County under the California Public Records Act, Haas's lieutenants were at loggerheads with Diebold staffers over such issues as lack of poll

many of the Registrar's problems. On September 11, for example, Registrar of Voters chief deputy **Len Schultz** emailed Diebold's **Michael**

Rockenstein to complain that John Decker, another Diebold employee, would not be in San Diego at the time promised. "John Decker just talked to one of my staff," Schultz wrote. "He said that according to his schedule, he is not going to be in San Diego until October 16. You have assured me that he will in fact be here beginning on September 18. I am very concerned that John's schedule does not reflect your assurances and that he will not be here next week. From what I understand, he is making travel arrangements to be back east next week.

"John is a key member of the team that will be significantly re-scripting our training," Schultz continued. "All of our planning has been based on having him available. His absence would have a significant impact. Please make sure that John and his manager are all on board with him being here next week."

Contacted by phone after last week's election, Schultz said that he and Rockenstein subsequently "negotiated back and forth" about the issue and finally agreed that Decker would not come to town until October 10. In spite of his earlier concerns expressed in the e-mail to Rockenstein, Schultz insisted that Decker's late arrival did not result in any training deficiencies.

But that wasn't the first time Registrar staffers expressed concern that election workers might not be up to the job. In an e-mail dated July 21, **Jean Olsson**, in charge of training "troubleshooters" — workers who are supposed to track down and resolve problems at the polls before they interfere with voting — voiced a series of worries to Schultz. "For the troubleshooter training facility," Olsson wrote, "my main concern is that 50 to a classroom is not a feasible plan with regard to troubleshooters receiving

the quality training they need to do their job. We found that for the June election that as the class size hit 20–22, having one instructor demonstrating and 2 helping begins to break down."

Olsson also voiced doubts about her ability to find enough qualified workers in time to train them all. "With a big push to recruit 200 people — we need to prescreen carefully. The 10% turnover in June was very difficult to manage. (I used 30 people from a back-up list in the last 2 weeks before the election after the initial group of 273 applicants were processed and scheduled for class).

"For example, all the last minute rush [of] recruits referred by **Edie Greise** and **Michael Nguyen** were no shows or dropped the day of their class. Unless we significantly increase our staffing, 10% of 500 turnover will be impossible to manage in the last 2 weeks before the election, especially from a remote training site. Every person replaced requires a change in a significant number of binder materials, and coordination of training, supply pick-up and redistribution, etc. We really need some script for everyone in the ROV to use to recruit and screen so that we attract the appropriate people."

Rich Get Richer, Pols Get Meaner

The election was a nasty, bitterly partisan battle pitting liberal against conservative, Republican versus Democrat, rich versus poor.

The combatants screamed at each other over such issues as tax cuts for the rich and immigration. But in the week since, we have been hearing about "fence-mending," "healing," "centrism," "goodwill," "moderation." Can we expect an

It's not likely. Rancorous political polarization is now normal. Over the last three decades, political polarization has intensified. And over that same period, the gap between rich and poor has also grown. And immigration has increased. This followed seven decades of the reverse: more political cooperation, more equitable wealth distribution, and more moderate immi-

it will last long," says Poole.
"Although there will be an increase in moderate Democrats, the elections disproportionately eliminated the center-right Republicans. The Senate will not change much in terms of polarization. Given the impending 2008 election, which will see billions of dollars — seriously — spent on each side, I doubt if goodwill will last very long."

Without saying it, he is giving ammunition to those who conclude that the United States has returned to robber baron days. Superrich individuals and corporations manipulate politicians of both parties, who despite their similar source of funds, go loudly in different directions. There is a vast gap between the rich and those on the lower rungs of the economic ladder. Immigrants are brought in to take undesirable jobs at low wages, or jobs are shipped to low-wage countries so that companies can maximize profits.


Poole coauthored a book this year that is creating a buzz in academia, Polarized America: The Dance of Ideology and Unequal Riches (M.I.T. Press). In the robber baron days more than a century ago, political parties were poles apart, and so were the income differences between the rich and everybody else. Then from 1913 to 1957, both political polarization and income inequality receded. Republicans and Democrats cooperated more, and wealth and income differences weren't so wide.

In 1977, the Gilded Age started returning: political polarization, as measured by a complicated formula devised by Poole and his colleagues, grew again, as income inequal-

Asylum from Homophobia

During the past year, about 30 transgender Tijuanenses, many of them prostitutes, left Tijuana and crossed illegally

into the United States. Bypassing San Diego, they settled in Los Angeles and San Francisco. Now some of them are seeking political asylum. They claim they were persecuted in Tijuana. "Given the circumstances," says Victor Clark Alfaro, director of the Binational Center for Human Rights in Tijuana, "I'm almost 100 percent sure that they will get this asylum."

The circumstances Clark speaks of involve municipal police officers. "What happened," he explains, "is about four years ago, around 100 [transgenders] in a matter of a week came to our office to complain about homophobia and persecution from the municipal police. We told these people that we would meet with the director of the municipal police and the mayor. We told them we'd hold a press conference to denounce the situation. But

munity to organize themselves, efforts which we fostered."

Clark is quick to point out that the alleged persecution is not a reflection of official police department policy. "It's not organized. It's part of the homophobia among police. They commit extortion against transgenders simply because they are homosexual and they dress like women. They'll see them, stop them, and they extort money from them. It's 'Give me your money or I'll take you to jail.' "

Jarrett Green, a San Francisco—based lawyer who is handling the asylum application of a 27-year-old Tijuana transgender named Karina García, says the alleged persecution does not stop at monetary extortion. To keep from going to jail, he says, transgenders in Tijuana are forced to give "sexual favors" and endure "sexual assault, forced

and the badge. There is lawlessness when it comes to the rights of homosexuals and transgenders in Tijuana."

Ironically, the transgenders' migration and requests for asylum come at a time when, at least according to Clark, the situation in Tijuana is much improved. "After the transgenders organized themselves," he explains, "we had a lot of meetings in our office with the chief of the municipal police. And together with him, in a matter of months, we diminished the police persecution probably 99 percent. Everything was running better. But a number of the transgenders still thought their quality of life was not the best in Tijuana. A group of them, led by one who went by the name Lucero — her name as a man was Javier Martínez came to me and said that even though they suffered from less police persecution than in the past, 30 of them had decided to cross into the United States by human smuggler."

Most of the 30 crossed between November 2005 and February 2006. "Before they went," Clark recalls, "we told them to go to San Francisco, because it's a more liberal society, and we advised them to seek political asylum."

The majority of the group

cía, made their way to San Francisco. Most, however, followed his advice regarding asylum. "Just two weeks ago," Clark says, "Jenny — I don't know the man's name he's using now — called me from Long Beach and asked me to send press clippings documenting the persecution of transgenders here in Tijuana. A bunch of them in Long Beach and Hollywood have banded together and are applying for asylum as a group."

Clark thinks they'll get it. Green is optimistic, but he says asylum is not a you-askedfor-it, you-got-it proposition. "Not at all," he explains. "Asylum is reserved for political refugees, people who are on the run, literally escaping disaster. That's the idea behind asylum. The notion is that you must request asylum officially within one year of your entry date into America. You can't wait five years and then all of a sudden say, 'Oh, I might get caught, I might as well apply for asylum at this point.' The idea is if it is such a dire escape from your country, it would certainly be clear to you that you should request it upon entry or within a year of entry."

Illegal entry into the United States, Green says, does not preclude application for asy-



lum is, sure, someone may have entered illegally, but they are respecting the legal process by voluntarily requesting asylum. It is not like they are illegally entering and then hiding in the country. They are escaping and entering the only way they can, and now that they are in America, they are going through all the proper procedures to insure that they can stay."

Besides suffering alleged police persecution, say gay activists in Tijuana, transgenders and gay men face job discrimination, making it difficult for them to find work in the city. Green says that "Mere financial benefit is not alone a reason for asylum. In order to qualify for asylum, you have to demonstrate that not only were you persecuted in your own country but that the persecution is on the basis of one of the five categories: race, religion, nationality, political opinion, or membership in a particular social group. The last category is the broadest

Though broad, the "membership in a particular social group" category has limits. "So if you are a Dodgers fan," Green explains, "and you're

seeking asylum because you were regularly beaten up by Yankees fans, you will not get it. They would reject it because being a fan of a baseball team is not core to your identity. But they have established that being homosexual is core to your identity, and therefore that qualifies. And in 2000, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals established that the category of belonging to a particular social group includes transgenders. The government in that case argued that this isn't like being homosexual. Transgenders are being abused and beat up and harassed because of the way that they are dressing. And putting on a dress isn't core to who you are as a person. But the court rejected that and said if you genuinely believe that you are a woman in a man's body, and you are expressing that core identity through your dress, that conticular social group."

Given that decision six years ago, and the testimony of Clark and others regarding persecution, the asylum case for the Tijuana transgenders looks like a shoo-in. But that

we also told them they needed to organize. ity returned with a vengeance. Corporate chief executive pay began soaring out of control and has not stopped. Immigration picked up in the 1970s

Here are some statistics (not necessarily used by Poole). Chief executives of the largest corporations make 500 times what the average worker makes. Forty years ago it was 80 times.

According to the Economic Policy Institute, the top 1 percent of Americans has 34.4 percent of the wealth. The top 5 percent has 58.9 percent. The bottom 80 percent has 15.3 percent.

The difference was not

always so steep. According to United for a Fair Economy, between 1947 and 1979, the most affluent 5 percent of the population had the lowest family income growth: 86 percent. The fastest growth was among the lowest 20 percent: 116 percent.

But between 1979 and 2000, things tipped in favor of the rich. Incomes of the top 1 percent grew 201 percent, while those of the bottom 20 percent grew by just 9 percent. These are similar to the phe-

nomena observed by Poole and his colleagues.

In the last 25 years, as the rich widened the gap with the poor, politicians became less tolerant of income-redistribution programs such as the minimum wage, Medicaid, and progressive taxation, says Poole. Republicans in the House and Senate latched on to the concept of the "ownership society." They wanted to privatize Social Security. They pushed tax cuts for the

Such moves seemed to backfire in last week's election. The public clearly has not bought into the ownership society. Republicans kept saying that the economy was improving. But it was improving for those at the top — not those in the middle and the bottom, that 80 percent. Their incomes have barely grown for several years.

New York Times columnist Paul Krugman, an economics professor at Princeton, has been reading the Poole findings and smelling the same kind of class warfare that is boiling in Latin America. Krugman's June 19 column was titled "Class War Politics," citing the work of Poole and his coauthors. Inequality killed bipartisanship, wrote Krugman. The Iraq War is a diversion, argued the professor. The real war is a class war, and as in the robber baron days, Republicans are interested in massaging one class: the upper one.

Krugman "is not incorrect, but there are a lot more subtleties," says Poole. "The very rich are getting much richer, but the overall level of wealth is increasing as well," except for the immigrants at the very bottom. "The people in the middle class are doing fairly well in terms of material goods."

Although there is a larger ideological fissure between liberals and conservatives and between Democrats and Republicans, both parties are cozying up to the rich, just as in the robber baron days. "The social bases of both parties are basically the better off," says Poole, pointing to the controversy over the estate tax: the debate has been over how many millions of dollars should be exempt from the tax. Few if any have argued that large estates should be taxed more than they are now.

"There is not a big constituency even in the Democratic Party for massive redistribution" of wealth and income.

Fifty years ago, Republicans and Southern Democrats were fiscally conservative, while Democrats thrived on the philosophy of tax and tax, spend and spend, elect and elect. But in the 1970s came supply-side economics. The Republicans had a new chant: cut taxes and cut taxes (mainly for the rich), watch the campaign money roll in, elect and elect.

Now, both parties are fiscally irresponsible. "I don't think either side can claim to be a steward of the treasury," says Poole.

He doubts that the public is getting aroused over excessive chief executive remuneration. "CEO pay is not a salient issue to most people," says Poole.

But Glen M. Broom, emeritus professor of communications at San Diego State University, thinks the pay gap is creating a crisis. "We have a socioeconomic status problem," says Broom. "We are creating a bipolar economic system; the middle class doesn't mean much anymore. I see signs that there is social conflict and that the social conflict is changing things within corporations." Broom is one of the authors of the long-

standing gold standard of public relations texts, *Effective Public Relations*.

Eyeing polls and various studies, Broom concludes that the public is fed up with excessive executive pay, corporate accounting scandals, and greed that is all too evident in companies, as well as at nonprofits and universities. "Public opinion is like atmospheric pressure," says Broom. "You're not always aware of it directly, but it is having an impact. The public is aroused," and corporations and politicians will have to respond.

In any case, last week's election shows that the political balance is shifting. But after a short period of calm, the invective may intensify.



hasn't proven to be so. In late February, Green and García had an official interview with a Citizenship and Immigration Services officer. "The asylum officer," Green explains, "has the authority to grant asylum unilaterally at that point, without a judge or a hearing."

That didn't happen, and they still await a decision. A possible holdup is the fact that many of the transgenders worked as prostitutes in Tijuana. And as part of the application review, Green says, immigration officials "try to determine whether or not the applicant has committed a 'crime of moral turpitude.' It

is not entirely clear what that encompasses, but certainly any type of violent crime is a crime of moral turpitude. Being a prostitute could qualify, but it is not on any particular list. And I'm ready to argue, if they reject our application, that transgender people in Tijuana have no option but prostitution. Not only are they persecuted by the authorities but by private businesses. They get pushed out of legitimate employment fields, and then the only way they can basically get enough money to pay their bills is to work in an exotic dance club or a brothel. My client, who was born and raised in Tijuana, wanted desperately to work there. But she got fired from the salon where she was a hair-dresser when she started to transform into a woman, at age 19, and no one else would hire her. So she was forced to work in these exotic dance clubs. And in the exotic dance clubs, a lot of prostitution occurs."

Whether or not the asylum is granted to the Tijuana transgenders, Clark says they represent a milestone "from the human rights perspective. I have been an expert witness in many cases involving political asylum in the courts of California and Texas. But I have never heard of such a number of Mexicans crossing in a short period of time to ask for asylum. This is very unusual."

"In atmosphere of love divine/ We live and move and breathe/ Though mortal eyes may

see it not/'Tis sense that would deceive./ The mortal sense we must destroy/ If we would bring to light/ The wonders of eternal Mind/ Where sense is lost in sight."

The opening hymn at First Church of Christ, Scientist, showed forth a great deal, starting with that word "atmosphere." Architect Irving Gill's design for the church the high, cream-white walls, unadorned but for the simple, soft curving arches of the windows and alcoves — did more to create a feeling than to draw the eye. And while the stainedglass dome overhead was certainly ornate, it also added to the general atmosphere, filtering the light, making it watery, slightly green. (The great bank of organ pipes that dominated the front wall, however, did seem a direct appeal to "mortal eyes" majestic sight.)

"The mortal sense we must destroy." A shift-

ing of consciousness, from focus on the material to focus on the spiritual, seemed central to the church's mission. After the First Reader read the 24th chapter of Genesis, in which Isaac takes Rebecca for a wife, she presided over a long period of silent prayer followed by "the Lord's prayer — with its spiritual interpretation as given in the Christian Science workbook."
"Which art in heaven" was interpreted as "allharmonious," reflecting Christian Science founder Mary Baker Eddy's vision of heaven as "harmony, the reign of spirit.""Thy kingdom come" became "Thy kingdom is come." It seemed that we only needed the spiritual eyes to see. Hence, "Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven," became "Enable us to know — as in heaven, so on earth — God is omnipotent, supreme." It was a question of knowing. The final request, "And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil" was similarly rendered as a proclamation: "And God leadeth us not into temptation, but delivereth us from sin, disease, and death."

The healing of disease was another theme. Said the Reader: "If you desire a more active role in Mary Baker Eddy's design for Christian Science to reinstate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing, you are most warmly invited to apply for membership in this church." After that, a woman sang Psalm 103 in a rich vibrato (mortal sense was not wholly neglected): "Bless the Lord, O my soul/ And forget not all His benefits/ Who forgives all your iniquities/ Who heals all your diseases...'

Before the sermon, the First Reader read a letter approved by Mary Baker Eddy that began: "Friends, the Bible and the Christian Science textbook are our only preachers..." The subject was Mortals and Immortals, and again, the shift from material to spiritual was stressed. After a text from the Psalms and a Responsive Reading from Isaiah, the First Reader was joined by the Second Reader, and the two traded off on multiple sections, first from the Bible and then from the textbook. Section One treated human frailty ("As for man, his days are as grass.") versus God's endurance, and concluded with Paul's state-

ment that "Henceforth know we no man after the flesh; yea, though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet now henceforth know we him no more. Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature." Eddy's commentary: "The Christ is incorporeal, spiritual yea, the divine image and likeness, dispelling the illusions of the senses...destroying sin, disease, and death. Into the real and ideal man the fleshly element cannot enter. Thus it is that Christ illustrates the coincidence, or spiritual agreement, between God and man in His image."

In later sections, the teaching was brought to bear on the fleshy business of marriage: "In the resurrection, they neither marry, nor are given in marriage, but are as the angels of God." And again, on the bearing of children: "In Science we are children of God; but whatever is of material sense, or

mortal, belongs not to His children, for materiality is the inverted image of spirituality." Not that earthly marriage and childbearing were evil, only that, insofar as they were material, they fell short of the ultimate reality.

What happens when we die?

Drew, the Second Reader, says, "I'm not going to take the position of speaking for the church. That would be very presumptuous. But it's in the books — the Bible and *Science and Health*." Congregant Reed Cardwell pointed out the exposition of the Bible's use of "year" in the latter's glossary: "One moment of divine consciousness, or the spiritual understanding of Life and Love, is a foretaste of eternity. This exalted view...would bridge over with life discerned spiritually the interval of death, and man would be in the full consciousness of his immortality and eternal harmony, where sin, sickness, and death are unknown.

My sister Meg lives in a 100-year-old drafty home in Massachusetts. Every winter she is freezing. To make matters worse, she is a string bean — no insulation at all on her bones — so she shivers away the long cold months. But this winter is going to be different. Lil' sis Eve is going to send her a down comforter to keep her warm.

Her big 50 is this year, and I think she deserves comfort. some Things have been tight this year for her, so I know if she bought one, she would go for a lowprice range. I want to buy her a quality comforter, not a cheap one. I just needed to find someone to give me the skinny on down comforters.

I found the info person, Michele Babcock, owner of Martha Smith Fine Linens in La Jolla. Babcock sells Scandia down comforters.

'There are different types of down,' explained Babcock. "You start out with Hungarian down and then you go to Polish down and then you go to Siberian down. Siberian down is the pièce de résistance; it's the top of the food chain. As you go toward the colder climates, it gets more expensive. The birds acclimate in the colder climates to keep warm." So fluffier, warmer down comes from the frigid areas of the world.

What should you look for when buying a comforter?

"First of all, I would always make sure that the comforter is 100 percent down, that there are no quills or feathers in it. Second, you want to make sure the comforter is baffled. Baffle boxes are the little squares sewn into the comforter. They keep the down insulated in that square. Comforters sometimes have straight lines down the comforter, no horizontal lines. So the feathers always end up at one end or the other of the blanket. You don't want that. You want the down to stay evenly spread throughout the comforter for maximum comfort and

What does fill power mean? "Fill power is the standard that tells us

the number of cubic inches filled by each ounce of down. The more space an ounce of down takes up, that is the more air it entraps, the more warmth it offers per ounce. The more volume one ounce has, the better the quality. So the higher the fill power, the better quality the down is going to be."

What about the fabric of the shell?

"The nicest comforters have scroll silk jacquard covering, and those are the most expensive ones. Others have cotton shells. Whatever the covering, it has to be tightly woven. A tightly woven shell is going to be more durable than a loosely woven shell. And generally, as you go up in the thread count, it is going to be a nicer shell, depending on its weave. It is like with sheets. The tighter the weave, the sturdier it is going to be.

Are there different weights in the

comforters?

"In the Scandia line, there is light, medium, and heavy. Really, nobody needs heavy in San Diego." But Meg will, I thought. "Light is good for summer, though it's not enough for the wintertime, then you need a medium. I tell people if they can afford it and they have the storage space, to buy a light for summer and a medium for winter. I took my medium-weight comforter off the bed in February or March. Often the department stores will just have one kind of comforter; they are not going to sell a light, medium, and heavy."

What do your comforters have that a department-store comforter does not have?

"Department-store comforters are going to be down out of China. All Scandia down is European down; we don't use any Chinese down.

> allergic to down.' Well, they are really not allergic to down, what they are allergic to is the dust on the feathers and the quills. Scandia down is washed 26 times. So we don't really have people being allergic to our down. And in the European countries, the down is a byproduct of the food industry; it is

> "And a lot of people say 'I am

waterfowl. With China down, you don't know what you are getting. So there is a big difference. It is like cashmere from China versus cashmere from Italy.

"You also want to buy a comforter with white goose down. It is a better quality down." That was one thing I did know about comforters — I detest white down comforters that you can look through to the gray feathers inside. It has a dirty look.

What price will you spend on a quality starter comforter?

"A basic, good-quality starter comforter, Gossamer, in a queen-size medium weight, costs \$500. Scandia also sells a couple's comforter. For a lot of couples, either the wife is hot or the husband is hot. One is cold, one is hot; nobody is ever on the same temperature. So, a couple's comforter has one side in one weight, and the other side is a different weight." I had found a winner, a comforter that would work for Meg and her warm-bodied husband. "For a queen-size couple's comforter, a light/medium is \$475, light/heavy is \$550, and medium/heavy is \$575."

How often should the comforter be cleaned?

"Comforters don't need to be washed that often because they are always covered with a duvet, so every couple of years it can be cleaned. It should be washed, not drycleaned; imagine dry-cleaning your hair."

Jenny exhaled and drew a measured breath to calm her nerves and then smiled and said, "Man, it just doesn't get any better than that. I feel so awake right now!" She caught my contagious giggles and we walked to my door, armin-arm, chortling.

"What's so funny?" David asked, eyeing us as we cackled our way into the living room.

"I scared the shit out of Jenny," I said with pride. Jenny nodded confirmation.

This took my sister and me by surprise. Horrible? Sick? More like hilarious, I thought — we were still suffering hiccups, the aftershocks from our earlier groundshaking guffaws. Despite our attempts to convince him that scaring people was fun, for both the scarer and the scaree, an incredulous David announced his assessment: "You guys are deranged."

As we sat in my office considering David's words, Jenny told me she feels special when someone takes the time and energy to properly frighten her. Two people in my sister's life who go above and beyond when it comes to demonstrating their affection via terrorism are her boyfriend, Brad, and her roommate, Dad.

Earlier that week, Jenny was given a good fright while washing the dishes. Mounted to the wall above the sink at Dad's place is a framed print of Van Gogh's Starry Night. 



reorienting. Less than 12 hours ago, I arrived at the San Diego airport, a thick coat of East Coast pale on my skin. Now I am in California, tucked up in an empty dorm at UCSD, easily the most well-maintained college campus I have ever seen, and am about to go headlong into the Pacific waters.

Beside me, Estela begins poking through her stack of moisturizers.

She is small, 28, but looks not a day over 18, with big brown eyes and the languid stature of someone younger.

She is, after all, on vacation, a celebratory one of sorts. On the short ride from the airport to the college,

she announced she had just received her U.S. citizenship. The citizenship is a mere legality. She returns to her homeland of Peru each summer and frequents the beaches there, where she first discovered surfers but never dared try it herself. "I'll still be Peruvian," she said in the car, looking into the distance. "I'll always be Peruvian." And, 1500 bucks and a round-trip ticket later, here she is, at surf camp, a bona fide American.

Out in the common room, a surf video plays on the small television. I watch as bikini-clad women slide down the face of impossible waves, boards staggeringly small in comparison. The women are fierce, concentrated, fearless. I watch their paths and wonder if any of them thinks about death, namely her own, at the hands of an often-brutal Mother Nature. I take in

their relaxed stances, their smooth turns and effortless maneuvers atop their boards, and gulp... Just a little.

Beside me, Eris and Leslie are slathering on sunblock. Eris rubs a thick pad of white zinc across her nose, careful to fill in the space around the little ring piercing her right nostril. She is the only one of the group who has been to Surf Diva before, but in a stroke of bad luck, she sustained an ankle injury two days into her trip. "But I'm back," she says, with a smile.

Leslie follows suit, zincing up her nose. The back of her tank top lists a selection of Maui-isms, including my favorite, "Speak softly and wear a loud shirt," which, as it turns out, describes Leslie to a T. Truly the strong, silent type (but wickedly funny when talkative), her wardrobe boasts bright teals, oranges, and rich blues.

Twin scars lace each of her knees where, a few years prior, doctors put in state-of-the-art, fully bionic new ones to replace the worn-out natural ones. This, however, seems not to deter her. Eris, whose voice is musical and frequent, is similarly attired, wearing a fiercely patterned surfinspired skirt. She tucks a few last-minute items into her wet-dry fanny pack, giving a few to Leslie for her matching one. A silver-haired couple in their mid-40s, both are avid water women, and references to their kayaking and boat trips abound. They seem, though both are hardworking medical professionals in various capacities, to be on a permanent vacation.

Denise, whose long legs take up most of the U-shaped couch, is the exact opposite. A single mother of four teenaged boys and recently divorced, she is a non-

stop mom and provider. Yet, despite the kids and heartbreak, Denise has the spryness and poise of a graceful adolescent, broad shoulders and strong stance indicative of her experience as a triathlete. Not surprisingly, she keeps the pace with her boys, snowboarding with them and, the summer previous, taking them on a weeklong surf clinic adventure in Santa Cruz. "My guys were much better than I was," she laughs, leaning into a cushion. She's from Sacramento (by way of Indiana) and has a mash-up accent that is half Midwest, half California. It seems a miracle that she has managed to carve out five days for surf camp. The night before, as we swapped introductions, she revealed to us her desire for a real, true vacation and, with a twinkle in her eye, the possibility of getting a

tattoo. "I wanted to do

something for me," she'd said, with conviction. "I want to have a Denise Week."

I flop down on the couch myself, tugging at the straps of my bathing suit, and page through a magazine. Almost as soon as I do, KT appears, wet suit draped over her arm. "Let's do it," she says.

The first thing I notice about the UCSD area, aside from the sheer volume of space, is what fills it. Cacti rise from the carpeted lawns of freestanding stucco palaces; fences drip with bright flowers and an overflow of waxy green leaves; palms shoot skyward on tall, bending trunks. The houses, alkali white, yellow, peach, sit peacefully behind oversized birdsof-paradise, roofs capped with terra-cotta tiles. The weather is balmy, sun warming

everything without being obtrusive, humidity barely detectable. Skies are clear in all directions, small planes pulling advertisements cutting across the unbroken blue.

Eves shielded by double-polarized sunglasses, I take it in from the windows of the Betty Bus, an ex-Hilton shuttle painted pink and appropriated by the Surf Diva team. Trucker flames stretch from cab to grille, and the horn, which is blown liberally, pipes out a piercing rendition of "La Cucaracha." KT pilots this behemoth, pushing the gas until the poor thing groans.

The landscape slides by. Betty jounces and rattles under me, and I tuck my knees to my chin, watching as a strip of ocean reveals itself from between a clot of palms. Waves peel lazily toward the shore, three distinct tiers of them, beautiful sets seen only





in books. I close my eyes a moment, trying to put it all together, trying to put it all in place.

I. Am. Here.

My four fellow surf campers recline, taking in the scene as well.

"Beautiful," Denise murmurs, legs folded up under her.

Estela is perched on her knees, nose to window, video camera poised.

"This is *amazing*," she squeaks, pressing the lens to the glass. "Oh my *God!*"

KT guides the Betty Bus into a parking lot, a jammed stretch of concrete flanked by a sizeable park. Gaggles of schoolkids tear across it, kicking soccer balls, tossing Frisbees, or just plain chasing each other, backpacks falling to the ground in careless heaps. They are unsupervised and seem impervious to the shadowy threats that bordered my city childhood — pickpockets, perverts — instead throwing themselves full force into their games. None of them, I notice, looks over a shoulder, narrows an eye and, I wonder, perhaps they don't have to.

KT parks the bus, and we pile out and head over to the waiting equipment truck to get our gear. Boards abound, neon and inviting, leashguards dangling like tails, wet suits and rashguards on racks. The sun is already hot on my back so I forgo the wet suit and am handed a ten-foot longboard, a massive, soft-top/fiberglass hybrid with a giant single fin. I hoist it atop my head, feeling the weight of it, turning toward the horizon. The water sparkles in front of me, an impossible shade of blue-green. Under the tentlike shade of my board, I watch as the waves roll in, carrying and swallowing surfers as they go. I have never seen sets so clean, so plentiful, so expansive,

so big. This goes on forever, unmarred by manmade rock formations or barriers, and clots of surfers sit atop their boards, waiting for the biggest and best.

Denise walks beside me, a big pink board on

her shoulders.

Del Mar, like La Jolla, is a town with money. I can just about smell it as we coast in, watching the fancy boutique storefronts slide by.



"That's it," says Denise. "That's what I want."





day of shopping in La Jolla proper. Denise is pointing to a small, silvery decal stuck just to the left of the "do not speak to driver while vehicle is in motion" sign. It's a surfboard, flanked by billowy butterfly wings that sprout from its center, all done in purply-pink glitter.

"Something like that," Denise murmurs, considering, "on my hip, maybe."

She smiles mischievously.

"What will my boys say?" she asks rhetorically, laughing; she's told them no body art until they are paying their own way and are out of the house. Financially independent herself, Denise is cleverly abiding by her own rules, but who can bypass the titillation of shock value?

Flies rise from the piles of seaweed the water kicks up, old soda and beer cans poking up from their midst. In a little cave-let, a bronzed, hoary hippie sparks up a little apple bong, washed-out eyes gazing across the horizon. The sun is slowly coming down and slants across my shoulder;

there is a peace here, and I don't want to leave but, alas, must rip myself away.

I keep this peace in mind as we venture back to our lodgings, as the hot water of the shower stings my scrapes and scabs. In the mirror, I notice that my face has darkened three shades, hair whitening at the tips already.





work hot on scent, outfox birds, and flush them into the swing of the sights of his shotgun.

Petey wasn't what you'd call a hunting dog. Certainly not a bird dog, that elaborate refinement in canine bloodlines with its mysterious capacity to separate game birds from other creatures and which, in extreme cases, exhibits itself as a strong tendency toward vanity, flightiness, hyperactivity, and neurosis. Petey was short and squat, with a long, mangy coat reminiscent of a sheep dog, except that you would have been hard pressed to delineate any sort of pedigree. Like most mongrels, Petey possessed that instinctual grasp on his situation in life which made him fully aware of whom he owed his existence to. He aimed to please.

ing bubbles from his nostrils, the rock held proudly in his muzzle. Scot is an electrician by trade, and on two-story construction sites, he had to ask carpenters to be careful about tossing two-by-four cut-offs to the ground. 

Wounded game was an especial pitfall. You put a knocked-out bird in a dog's mouth, even the toothless mouth of a wise old mutt, and when the bird comes back to life, wings beating furiously against canine chops, it's awfully hard for any dog not to lose his cool.

handsome and diligently maintained. On some of them, he's customized the stocks to match his grip perfectly, to fit more snugly against his cheek, or to give him a better look at clay birds cutting through the air at something approaching 100 miles per hour. None of these fine-tuned guns

has ever killed a thing. They're used, instead, exclusively at gun clubs, those obscure and utterly ordered tracts of land where shot-gunners toe lines like basketball players spaced around the key in preparation for a free throw and where hidden machines explode rhythmically to life on com-

mand of that solemn utterance, "Pull!"

Just as Petey had accompanied Scot for more than a decade to construction sites all around North County, he rode in the bed of the red pickup to nearly every gun club in Southern California. Unlike construction workers, however, clay-bird shooters are fanatic about their concentration, and the last thing they want is a playful hound begging for fun at their feet. So even when Petev was still able to hop out of the back of the pickup truck, and especially when he could no longer make that jump without collapsing to his belly, he spent many a long hour waiting for Scot to conclude the 100 or 200 or more shots each day of practice or competition. He got to know some parking lots well. Station. It's hard to say what Petey made of the place. The layout of the car lot, sidewalk, and picnic tables,

"It was easy," Scot now says, recounting a day he'd rather forget. "I didn't have to do anything except wait there and shoot. But shooting isn't hunting."

The most recognizable one was, naturally enough, the parking lot of the Miramar Gun Club, our own local clay-bird shootery tucked between Highway 163 and I-805 at the south end of Miramar Naval Air

combined with the adjacent trap and skeet fields, is not unlike an expanded, open-air version of a bowling alley. If the reader can picture the club-length spectator area as similar to the low-level, table-lined mez-

zanine above the bowling lanes that he must have known somewhere as a teenager, and, in the same light, he can picture small groups of sportsmen wielding shotguns instead of bowling balls as they move about within the circumscribed confines of individual, geometric approach points, he will be a long way toward seeing what kind of place this gun club is. Now, substitute the steady crack of gunfire for the echoic rumble of heavy balls striking wooden pins, and you are even closer to an image of just what it is we're talking about — a shotgun range. Is that clear?

There are two games that shotgunners play: trap and skeet. Variations on each also exist, none of which I'll go into. This is going to be hard enough.

Trapshooting originated in England toward the end of the Eighteenth Century, the name coming from the cages, or traps, from which live pigeons were released for the benefit of privileged, aristocratic sportsmen. Later, traps were exchanged for mechanical devices that could throw inanimate targets, and the birds evolved into clay discs, affording a more popular and humane system of targets scored "dead." (There was a brief period, however, when targets took the form of glass balls filled with feathers, a curiously unique touch of realism.) Today a round of trap consists of a total of

25 shots divided between each of five different shooting stations located on a semicircular walkway 16 yards behind the trap house. The targets are thrown out from the house, flying away from the shooter at varying angles. There are limits to those angles; yet, within these parameters, the flight of the target remains unknown until seen. All of which means the shooter has no more than two seconds to spot the target, swing the barrel of his shotgun onto the course of the target, aim, and fire. Do I also need to mention the necessity to lead the bird?

Skeet is a somewhat faster game. Invented in America in 1920 by a group of Massachusetts sportsmen who wanted to improve their aim before hunting season, skeet is a simulation of the flight patterns of live birds by the presentation of those same clay trap targets at a variety of sharper angles within a tighter shooting range. The shooter moves to eight different stations along a semicircle, calling

for targets that are thrown either from the high house (ten feet) at the left of the field, the low house (not over three feet) at the right of the field, or both houses. I'm making a long story short. Depending on the station, the bird is flying either toward you or away from you, from your left or from your right, or, at

gun club, much as he counts on his Saturdays for a couple of hundred rounds of practice shots. Yet it was actually a day, as far as Petey was concerned, like countless others. 



The shotgun in the \$1000 to \$2000 range will definitely see action, although most of it will generally be in the form of competitive target shooting. Other than the artwork,

there isn't really much to separate a top-notch trap or skeet gun from those of investment stature. On the other hand, it's not the sort of shotgun one would want to beat up in the field. That's the role of the hunting gun, which can be acquired for about the price of a personal computer and which, if the hunter is fortunate, will be used enough to take on that pleasantly worn aspect of a pair of old Levi's.

I know of a fellow who

owned a vintage 28-gauge Parker side-by-side that he used for both hunting and shooting targets, despite its resale value as a handsome, hard-to-obtain classic. One day he left the gun standing in a rack at a gun club while he went to the clubhouse for a cup of coffee, and he watched with horror as a young kid ran out to the rack, grabbed his gun, and took off in a car. A week later the Parker turned up at the scene of a holdup. The buttstock had been cut down to nothing, the double barrels sawed off short. It was truly a crime. A priceless shotgun was now worth nothing, while some punk got canned for blowing a quick-buck, liquor store

Like a lot of sons before me, I got my shotgun as a birthday gift from my father. The similarities, I suspect, end right there. I was turning an age when it had been a long, long time since anybody had considered me a youngster; and I'd never shot a shotgun, with my father or anyone else.

The gun was my request — and it surprised the heck out of my dad. After pheasant in Nebraska corn fields, and duck and geese along the North Platte River, any shotgun game in Southern California had seemed entirely too pale for my father's notions of hunting. He kept his gun — an old 12-gauge Remington pump — in his closet, never once removing it from its case, much less teaching me how to use it. But I knew the gun was there. I phoned my dad and asked him to give it to me because, out of the blue, I'd been figuring it was time I learned about shotguns, in case I ever made it to a little house in God's country, with nearby game birds running thick in the

My father brought over the gun, and he took it out of its ragged canvas case and showed me how to put it up. Immediately I had a strong sense of my father's love for that gun. He handled it with the care of a veteran ballplayer slipping on a favorite glove; and when he finally handed it over to me, I knew it wasn't without some regrets. "It's yours," he said, "under one condition. Don't you ever sell it."

The gun actually belonged to my grandfather. At least it did until Grandpa died this spring. The day we buried him, the family stood around Grandpa's house drinking the last of his Hamm's beer; and as such things happen on these occasions, we got to tracing the whereabouts of Pop's guns. Now I had the 12-gauge. The little .410, which to hunters is what a fly rod is to fishermen, had been given away, along with

Grandpa's pointer, to a hunting buddy back in Fort Wayne, Indiana, when Grandpa was making ready to move out West to California. And Uncle Dick, my dad's brother, said he had the 20-gauge. "Got it right by my bed," he announced. "I hung up feed sacks all along the fence, and from my front door, I know the pattern the gun throws around every inch of my property. They're running dope all over Riverside."

I didn't want to hear it. I didn't want to hear it any more than I wanted to hear my little sister tell about the dozen or so handguns her husband, a cop, has stashed around their house in Long Beach. It took me 30 years to find out even how to load a gun, and now some of my family was just stinking with them. My father looked at his brother and said, "If you think it's that bad, why the hell do you live there?"

Because I knew Scot Harrison and trusted him, I asked him to teach me to shoot. He was more than happy to oblige. He's got his circle of gun-club pals, whom he jokingly refers to as "shootin' buddies," but he's always trying to enlist new blood, especially if he feels it's someone who's a real sportsman. Well, I'm at least that. I come by it honestly enough, through lineage I can't deny. (There's even a story - entirely undocumented — that contends my great-grandfather emigrated after being run out of Bohemia for poaching game on royal lands.) Anyway, Scot invited me out to Miramar, and I showed up one Saturday with a box of dusty shells and my 60-yearold Remington, which I still hadn't shot and still didn't know if it was safe to do so. Scot gave my gun the onceover, smiling the way gun lovers will when handling a classic — or even a dated, workingman's relic. He remarked that the gun had certainly seen some use. But there wasn't a spot of rust on it, and after a thorough spraying with WD-40, Scot had the pump moving freely, the click of secret mechanisms ringing sweetly in my ears. Scot loaded the gun and pointed it toward the horizon, where navy jets roared down from the sky. He gave the trigger a squeeze.

Anybody who is new

to guns, especially shotguns, cannot help but be shaken by the first, up-close blast of gunpowder exploding inside a hand-held metal barrel. I felt, for a moment, that I might be wading in over my head. But then I

shot the gun myself, and I eventually got used to the noise, the jolting kick, the smell of spent shells, the mechanics of reloading. I understood that this was something done commonly by men, women, and

ken clay target, and he had me stand next to him and point the gun safely away. He tossed the clay chip into the air. I watched it reach its apex, and I aimed and fired. The target fell untouched to the ground.

from my feet. Scot remained patient, telling me that this was actually not the easiest of shots, my gun and shell pattern being designed to hit birds at least 50 yards away. I was hardly consoled.

connect. Then we went to one of the trap fields, and I shot at flying targets until my shoulder was sore. On my last round, I scored 13 out of 25. We shot skeet, too; and with one of Scot's old 20-gauges — the gun, in fact, with which he used to hunt quail — I turned a few of those clay pigeons into dust.

You hit them that way — dead center with the heart of your pattern and the four-inch clay disc

disappears in a puff, the impact as terse as a good fast ball meeting the fat of a bat. Scot said I was doing pretty well. On my last round of the day, I tallied a double; and when we finally packed it up, I felt that with practice I could make a fairly decent trap or skeet shooter.

I haven't shot a gun

This is Scot Harrison the last time he went hunting:

he had a number of reasons to feel out of sorts. Petey wasn't with him. His buddies, across from him at a pond out Anza Borrego way, were drinking beer and blasting away at doves. The birds, as quail never are, were thick as gulls around a public beach, and all it took to nail them was a quick gun and a good eye. Then, when the doves got smart — or at least as smart as doves ever get — they kept cutting short their approach to their water hole. And like the lowest kind of dry-gulch hunter, Scot poked his gun out of the tall desert brush, ambushing birds one by one. "It was easy," Scot now says, recounting a day he'd rather forget. "I didn't have to do anything except wait there and shoot.

But shooting isn't hunting." Shooting clay pigeons isn't hunting, either. So if you're counting, that's two reasons why I haven't fired a shotgun since that first and only time.

Shooting without hunting seems, to me, a rather strong sub-instance of putting the cart before the horse. I admit an instinctual prejudice. At the same time, it would be wrong to assume I maintain a wholesale distaste for killing. I raise chickens, and when their good laying days are over, I can start them on their way to the stewing pot with my bare hands.

It's simply a matter of available game - or, in this case, the lack of it. Here in San Diego, where, for now, I'm making my stand, game for hunters has become scarce indeed.

Had I a notion otherwise, Scot put me off the idea of hunting doves. Mammals I won't even talk about, for reasons that go far beyond the fact that hunting them demands a rifle instead of a shotgun. Ducks and geese, which used to be hunted locally from, among other places, blinds along manmade ponds you can still see in San Elijo Lagoon, remain something I'll consider only if I find myself on flyways a long, long way north of here. I've heard pheasant have been introduced to farmlands out toward El Centro, but that's the sort of privateproperty hunting that requires connections, hobnobbing, or money. Which leaves me with quail, the treasured game of Scot Harrison, and a lot of other

local hunters besides.

Now, quail hunting I can get excited about. At least conceptually. There's the walking, the stalking, the necessary intimacy with both terrain and game, the few select shots on which hinge a day's success or failure. I wouldn't mind a meal or two of quail, either, the little breasts braised in butter and garlic and ginger root, the legs deep-fried in oil with a flour and curryspice coating. And I'd love to hunt with a dog, watching that intensity which has been bred into it, following it as it works tirelessly in the bush, trailing scent, finding birds, pointing, retrieving — doing all of those dog things for the pure pleasure of hunting, and for the pleasure of pleasing its master. I'd especially like hunting with a dog.

Not long ago, I saw Scot Harrison out at a construction site where I was pounding nails for my daily bread. He was on his way to Miramar for some serious practice for the upcoming skeet nationals. He asked me if I'd like to join him.

I was embarrassed to confess that I hadn't shot my gun since that first day of learning. I wasn't even sure where I'd stashed it. Scot laughed, then said it didn't matter; he always had an extra gun with him. What about it?

I said I didn't know. Scot took it as a tacit refusal, and he tossed his tool belt into the back of his pickup, a brand-new Nissan, and he hopped in up front. He swung the truck out onto the street, only to pull to the curb and lean his head out the window. "You wanna go hunting this year?"

Scot's old tool box was in the bed of the new pickup, along with his usual assortment of big rolls of wire, lengths of PVC conduit, milk crates piled high with electrical boxes, and, stacked one atop the other, two briefcase-like shotgun cases. The only real difference was that Petey wasn't there.

"Go hunting for what?" I asked.

"Quail. Rustle yourself up a 20-gauge, and do it right now. You don't want to be practicing when birds are in the air."

I went home and uncovered the Remington, and I found I still knew how to put it up and load it. I assumed it still fired, too. But it's an awfully big gun, big enough to whip you if you tried lugging it around through thick desert sage in search of quick little quail. Now it's back in its tattered case, re-oiled and waiting for some distant, promised land.

Though a sentimental notion, I've come to see in recent years why the quail is our state bird. More than that, it's the bird of the Southland, broadly defined as chaparral, and my particular home since day one. From the windswept coast to the hot, dry hills, the live oak canyons to the sagesweet deserts, quail are an icon, an animate symbol of something right when it seems, more and more, that the territory is all shot to hell. I love quail — and lately I've been hunting them every chance I get.

I hunt quail from my pickup truck, on foot in public nature reserves, at

the edge of housing tracts and sordid building developments where we as Californians are helping the republic really to pour on the coals. Sometimes I first see them scurrying through the brush or perched atop a yucca or fence post. Sometimes I hear them, that comical call of "Chi-ca-go, Chica-go," or "Where are you? Where are you?" I hunt quail, coming as close to them as I can to indulge myself in their elaborate beauty: the forward-curving plume, creamy forehead and black throat, the grayish-blue breast and softly mottled nape, the plump belly scaled with markings as sharp as miniature arrowheads. Eventually the quail flush at my approach. Yet if I've hunted well, I can actually hear the furious beating of their wings; and as the birds peel off in one direction or the other, gaining speed in their distinctive up-tilted flight, I swing on them with an imaginary shotgun, making sure to lead them that ever-so-slight amount.

"Bang!" I say. And "Bang!" again if I feel I would have needed the second barrel and if the hell-bent quail are still in range of my secret over-and-under 20-gauge.


I'd do better if I had a dog. Perhaps, say, a young Brittany spaniel, behind which I'd have to hunt close because, my regard for discipline what it is, I wouldn't have trained it to hold a point. But unless I get into quail for real, it'll have to remain an imaginary dog. I can think of few things lower than having a dog hunt up birds and then playing make-believe to salve your own uneasy heart. It just wouldn't be fair.

Scot stopped hunting quail, I see now, because Petey had grown too old to join him. Leaving his dog behind would have been as absurd as hunting without a gun. Petey loved hunting, and Scot loved hunting with Petey. We'll see what happens now. There are quail still running in the brush, and Scot is still a hunter at heart. When he buried Petey, he buried a big portion of his past.

It's something I've been thinking about, too. ■

The soldiers had scrambled to find a baby's coffin and dig the smaller grave. Aguirre's burial was already on their schedule, but when the Jiminez girl died that morning, it seemed most efficient to inter them at the same time. Between the continuing border dangers of the Mexican Revolution and the ominous war expanding through Europe, the men at Ft. Rosecrans had bigger concerns than supervising the daily lives of hundreds of Mexican military detainees, their

Kosterlitzky, retreated with his men across the broad street that divided

the Mexican side of the town from Nogales, Arizona. He surrendered to his friend and fellow Indian-fighter Captain Cornelius Smith of the Arizona Rangers to avoid certain slaughter.

Adding to the pressure on Kosterlitzky, a young man on the Arizona side had been hit by a stray shot, and American military officers insisted that the fighting stop before it spilled across the border. The Mexican forces relinquished their horses and their arms and came under the control

of the United States.

The War Department in Washington ordered the soldiers detained at Ft. Huachuca for violating the Neutrality Act as foreign combatants on neutral soil, though their exact legal status would be an ongoing argument. They would be guarded by the U.S. Army, already stretched thin protecting nervous Americans from dangers real and imagined from Mexican revolutionaries, tracking arms smugglers and raiders, and protecting American refugees

To guard them and police the border in the vicinity of Nogales requires the detachment of five troops from their regular station at Ft. Huachuca, whereas two troops would be sufficient were it not for the necessity of this guard duty....

In response to ongoing complaints, after the detainees had been confined for four

The Sun reporter effused, "Preferring captivity on American soil to dangerous freedom in bloody Mexico, and realizing that they will receive only kind treatment at the hands of a civilized, if foreign government, nearly 500 Mexicans...were to arrive in San Diego at 4 o'clock this afternoon.... As it would be almost inhuman to drive them back into their own country, where terror and suffering go hand in hand, they must be kept in custody here until conditions become settled. The immigration laws

forbid their liberation."

The San Diego Union more soberly reported, "The prisoners will be required to do their own cooking and to keep their quarters in a sanitary condition, said Major Davis yesterday, 'but under the laws governing prisoners of war, it will be impossible to put them to work. They will be allowed to pass the time as they see fit, so long as they do not violate the rules we set down for them and stay within the boundaries of the camp.'

military barracks. Soldiers kept the crowds in hand. Reporters outflanked them to interview anyone who looked like he might be in charge. The San Diego Union sent a photographer armed with his new "flashlight camera," ready to take the first nighttime photographs to be published in the paper.

Dozens of families from San Diego's Mexican community arrived with bags of sweet rolls and other fresh food and jostled with guards as they passed the gifts to their countrymen through the train windows. Observed the Sun, "In the way of shaking hands, they caressed each other."

After waiting all night in the train cars, the internees finally moved into the barracks at dawn. An enthusiastic Sun reporter said of the

Mexican town had been picked up with all its inhabitants and transplanted right here in San Diego, the scene could not have been more truly characteristic of life below the border." He described a chaos of bewildered, exhausted refugees in a tumult of shouting, crying babies, barking dogs, and cackling chickens. "Each refugee wore his native garments....The women, some rather pretty, others fat and not so pretty, were mostly roughly dressed.... Some of the men carried highly colored serapes or blankets and others boasted brilliant sashes and cuffs of tinsel fringe or dirty lace. Federal officers among the captives wore the regulation uniform of Mexico....

"There were dogs of all sizes, breeds, and shapes. Each Mexican

family had at least two. There were also chickens and rabbits which the refugees had brought with them as they took their flight. One woman carried a squealing baby under one arm and a game rooster under the other. A tall Mexican carried seven fat hens in his arms, and another refugee was lugging a half-grown goat.... There were bird cages with feathered occupants, musical instruments, highly colored pictures, mostly religious, and bits of bric-abrac."

American soldiers heaped the baggage onto mule-drawn army wagons for the trip on dirt roads north on India Street and then to Point Loma. In groups of 50 or so, the Mexicans boarded an army launch that would ferry them across the bay to the fort's quarantine station



at La Playa. Some did not go easily. As Colonel Kosterlitzky would later say of his soldiers, mostly natives of the Sonoran desert, "As we were about to embark on the government boat to cross to the reservation, I noticed that my men were holding back and showing signs of great fear.

" 'What?' I said. 'You men have never failed me under fire. Are you going to let water scare you?'

"'Yes,' they replied.
'But fire is one thing.
This sea is another. It's
new to us.'

"I had to get them on board, so I called on their pride. 'Forward,' I said, 'and let any coward hang back.' And they followed me."

"The Eagle of Sonora" Sixty-year-old, silverhaired Kosterlitzky cut a unique figure among his men. He stood more than six feet tall, and on special occasions like this he favored a white linen officer's uniform and white sun helmet with a tall brass spike. Gold-frame glasses rested on his strong, straight nose. His thick gray mustache swept from cheek to cheek.

One reporter described the colonel as soft-spoken though intense, appearing more like a scholar than a soldier. But he was a notorious commander in the state of Sonora — called the Mailed Fist of Díaz for his decades as an enforcer of the peace under president Porfirio Díaz. The colonel made his name suppressing miners' strikes, arresting bandits and smugglers, fighting Yaqui Indians, and chasing Geronimo and the Apaches. When necessary, Kosterlitzky, like other government

commanders, increased the army ranks by conscripting men from Mexican jails. On the enlistment forms for one group of reluctant recruits Kosterlitzky wrote, "Here are 25 patriotic men. Please return my handcuffs and I'll send you another 25."

Russian-born (baptized Emil), son of a cavalry officer, Kosterlitsky was raised in European military schools. In 1873, aged 20 and assigned to the czar's navy rather than the cavalry, he took the opportunity of a port call in Venezuela to jump ship. He migrated to Mexico, where he enlisted as a private in Díaz's army. Within a dozen years, he would hold double ranks — a colonel in both the Mexican National Guard and the Mexican treasury department's Gen-

Kosterlitzky admired Díaz for, among other things, his willingness to maintain peace in the countryside with force, by threat or action. An orderly universe appealed to both men. But by 1913 his friend Díaz was in exile. And though Kosterlitzky had no use for the successors, Madero and Huerta, he was still loyal to his own vision of Mexico, a country he had loved and served for 40 years, his adopted home, and the birthplace of his wife and five

children.

On this particular August day in San Diego, the colonel supervised the movement of his troops and their families, chatting with the American officers, including Captain F. W. Benteen, commander of Company M of the 12th Infantry, which would guard the Mexican camp. At the captain's heels was his constant companion, his terrier Jeff. Benteen's father and Kosterlitzky had fought Apaches together on the border before the senior Benteen was killed with Custer at Little Big

By nightfall the refugees were across the bay. They were confined inside the white-board fence of the fort's quarantine station where, within a week, four babies would be born. one named Uncle Sam, if newspaper reports can be believed. The only casualty of the noise and confusion of moving day was the station's parrot, Snooky Ookums, which escaped through an open door.

THE LAWSUIT

A guard at the Ft. Rosecrans gate stepped into the road to challenge the man alighting from a rented buggy and carrying a fat leather briefcase. His name was Mr. H.R. Gamble, he said, of Walthall and Gamble, Attornevs-at-Law, El Paso, and he was there to see the Mexican prisoners. He was their legal representative in a habeas corpus proceeding filed in Texas on their behalf. He demanded to speak with his clients.

The next day, he would refile the habeas corpus pleading in federal court for the Southern District of California, the detainees' new jurisdiction. If a judge agreed to hear the case, Washington would have to present a legal argument for holding foreign nationals at Ft. Rosecrans. The lawyer could hardly know that 90 years later his petition would surface again in connection with foreign nationals at Guantanamo Bay.

IN DETENTION

Adding to Gamble's frustration, while he negotiated with the guards, he could look through the fort's gate and see his clients' new encampment. A hundred vards south of the main entrance, on the east side of the road, the prisoners were busy building their new home. Within a week they had erected a 10foot-high wooden-post and barbed-wire fence around their two acres of dirt and scrub. While the women cooked chile and tortillas over open fires and herded children and animals, the men dug and hammered to install large, conical army tents with wooden floors. Bachelor soldiers bunked here; families had wooden lean-to shacks or individual tents.

Tubs and tables under a flat wood roof served as the communal laundry. The men dug toilets (men's and women's separate facilities); they installed a shower room and even built a small jail. In spare time, some clever woodworkers fashioned a two-foot-high replica of Mexico City's Church of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Mounted on a wooden platform, it was the camp's religious shrine. Churches in the San Diego area would send priests to serve the people's needs.

According to a Union reporter, the social center of the little Mexican town was a makeshift PX. The men gossiped, joked, smoked, played cards, and generally relaxed at the store, which sold fruit, "tobacco, special canned stuff, and other luxuries." The Sun noted that the soldier assigned as

storekeeper spoke no Spanish, so Captain Benteen was frequently called to clear up misunderstandings "because he savvies un poco Mex."

The internees received weekly rations of staples: flour, meat, beans, sugar, and coffee supplied by the U.S. military, in spite of formal objections from some local and U.S. officials. Salaries paid by the Mexican government through its San Diego consulate provided spending money for extras. They earned between \$1.50 and \$5.50 U.S. a week, depending on each man's company and rank.

Point Loma in 1913 was a fairly remote destination, the only things of interest beyond some fishing communities being the fort, the crumbling lighthouse, a golf course, and Madam

Tingley's exotic Theosophical Society. But with the arrival of the Mexican soldiers, curiosity seekers appeared often to gawk through the fence. Army biplanes buzzed the camp, and pilots from Glenn Curtiss's school on North Island performed aerobatics for the Mexicans' amusement. At first this scattered them in fear, though some may already have seen biplanes from Pancho Villa's tiny "air force" in the skies over northern Mexico. All day long naval exercises and target practice echoed across the bay.

Nights fell cold, damp, and foggy bone chilling for the Sonorans. Even the warm days were tinged with the unfamiliar smell of the sea. A San Diego woman issued a plea for clothes for the

refugees, since the local Red Cross was not allowed to help them. For many weeks the detainees were a frontpage topic in newspapers and among the locals. Captain Benteen said proudly to a Union reporter, "These people are highly contented here. They are even happy. They are getting a square deal and they appreciate it."

DISSENTION IN THE RANKS

Despite Benteen's reassuring words for the public, U.S. State Department records from the time reveal that not everything ran smoothly. Within a month of their detention, a Major Duhagon of the Mexican regular army sent a telegram to President Woodrow Wilson complaining of general "bad treatment" at the camp. Transcripts of

interviews conducted for the investigation by Major Davis reveal that Duhagon objected to several men being placed in the guardhouse for eight days on bread and water for refusing to help repair the road to the camp and refusing to fix a drainage ditch. He further noted that prices at the camp store were excessive and that Captain Benteen had refused him parole to mail letters to his family and had once searched the camp for weapons.

The same transcripts present Davis's findings. According to Captain Benteen, he had first placed the reluctant workers in the guardhouse on full rations. But they seemed to find the accommodations pleasant enough, so Benteen ordered bread and water, which was much more effective,



The expensive sweater and wool blanket from the camp store of which Duhagon complained were found to be of superior quality and therefore fairly priced. As for Benteen's parole refusal, the captain noted that once before Duhagon had gone off to Ocean Beach under guard and returned at 11 p.m. instead of the required 6:30 p.m. Duhagon had felt he was being "spied on"; Benteen believed the major could not be fully trusted. As for the weapons search, this was considered reasonable. Concluded Davis, "The charges referred by Major Duhagon are the result of the pique and malice of an individual who deserves but does not relish salutary discipline...."

FROM OCEAN BEACH TO MAZATLÁN

During their stay at Forts Huachuca and Bliss, Colonel Kosterlitzky and Colonel Reyes, his counterpart commander of the regular army companies, had been given "permanent parole" status. Once transferred to San Diego, they were not confined with their men and were allowed more freedom, with quarters outside the detainees' stockade. Field officers were housed in their own area within the stockade. The colonel and his family lived in a large harborside house just north of the fort gates, near what is now Kimball Street. His children went to Roseville School, delivered there by a wagon pulled by two army mules. His oldest son had a newspaper delivery route for the San Diego Union; he was lucky enough to own a bicycle, so he could reach the few homes scattered along the point. Each Sunday

Kosterlitzky himself spent most of his days

spent most of his days meeting with visiting Mexican officials at the U.S. Grant Hotel, keeping abreast of politics to the south, following the progress of the federal lawsuit, and negotiating the repatriation of his men. As for the field officers, when they arrived in San Diego, Kosterlitzky had vouched for the honesty of the men, who exercised their freedom by visiting local diversions, especially Ocean Beach's Wonderland amusement park, with its Ferris wheel and dance pavilion.

One night in early September four officers failed to report to the head-count at sunset. They had left for Wonderland but turned south and crossed the border into Tijuana. They refused to return to the U.S., and Benteen could find no law that could force them back. Señora Mendez, wife of an army captain, had followed her husband down the dusty, rutted road to the border, but she was captured before she could cross and was brought back to La Playa.

camp for the mandatory

Angered by the men's breech of trust, Kosterlitzky himself mounted his horse and searched the country-side for the AWOL soldiers. Benteen went to Tijuana to negotiate their return. Telegrams flew between Rosecrans and the army headquarters of the Western Department in San Francisco. The Secretary

of War of Mexico wired that the escaped officers had been ordered to return to the U.S., "complying with their word of honor." For two weeks, U.S. Army officers met the various cargo steamers arriving from Mexico, expecting the escapees to be on board. The last official word, near the end of September, was that the men had sailed from Ensenada to Mazatlán. It seemed that Benteen's contented charges were still strongly connected to events in their home country and were determined to rejoin the fight.

After the officers' escape, the army increased security around the detainees' stockade, but otherwise life appeared to return to normal. The medical corps held a mass inoculation in the camp against the typhoid epi-

demic spreading across the country. The Carnaval Cabrillo livened the point, as the Spanish ambassador, Spanish soldiers, U.S. Congressmen, the Marine band, and state and local officials formed a motorcade at San Diego's courthouse and drove down the spine of Point Loma, above the detainees' camp, to the lighthouse. Flags flew, canons boomed, and people cheered as the point was dedicated as the future site of a monument to Juan Cabrillo. One highlight of the day-long events that the Mexicans couldn't appreciate was a chariot race between Mayor Percy Benbough and former mayor James E. Wadham. The four-horse carts ran a course down the main street of Ocean Beach, ending in festivities at Wonderland.

Perhaps mirroring events to the south, at the time the officers deserted, strong Santa Ana winds began to blow, filling the coastal air with dust, ash, and smoke. Daytime temperatures reached 109. The Mexicans went to bed each night watching the northern horizon glow from the flames of a 50,000-acre brush fire that spread from Ramona and San Pasqual to Mt. Woodson and Poway. Cyclone winds hit a house in La Mesa and tore off its roof. Three houses in North Park were burned to the ground. It would be five days before the weather turned and the damage could be assessed.

UNEASY TIMES IN SAN DIEGO

By the fall of 1913, three months after the Mexicans arrived in San Diego, their curiosity value had run out. Instead, the front pages of the *Union* and the Sun were splashed with rumors of battles in Ensenada, Tijuana, and Mexicali; reports of American and Asian refugees rushing across the border to U.S. soil: and details of the movements of Mexican officials and mysterious groups of men in and out of the Embarcadero.

At the city wharf, Kosterlitzky himself observed one such contingent, described by the Sun as "150 to 200 strange Mexican men, all wearing tan shoes and new felt hats of similar design." They'd arrived by rail and steamer from the north. According to port officials, they were simply sugarcane workers returning to their homeland from the fields in Oxnard. But the news-



papers reported rumors that they wore cartridge belts under their vests and had called any Mexicans left on the pier "cowards."

All this rekindled panic in the local population and brought fears of a declaration of war with Mexico. One day a yacht flying a Mexican flag sped through the harbor, chased by a torpedo boat. The police station and newspaper offices were flooded with anxious San Diegans, sure the war had started. After a few inquiries, the Sun discovered it was simply two boats chartered by the Lubin Motion Picture Co. enacting a scene for one of its forthcoming thrillers.

War rumors were so intense in the city that they even inspired two local girls to run away to join the fighting, wherever they might find it. Said the Union, "Two girls, Marion Trafton, aged twelve, and Margaret Grubbe, thirteen, the latter dressed as a boy and armed with a revolver, set out from their homes in Encanto yesterday afternoon with blankets and food, which they asserted they would use when they camped on their journey.... It is feared they have crossed the border....The Trafton girl wore a long white coat and a blue velvet hat with a white plume. Her hair, naturally blond, had been dyed black."

Inevitably, border tensions began to affect relations between the Anglo and Mexican populations in the city. Police raided bars, taking weapons from Mexican patrons and jailing any who resisted. Civilians often joined the fray. According to the Sun, "Taking exception to the flippant remarks of a crowd of Mexicans at Fourth and E last night, a number of bluejackets from the U.S. fighting craft now in this port tore into the darkskinned aggregation with a vengeance....The Mexicans' cries of 'Viva la Mexico' were soon silenced by the fists of the Americans...." Relations became so bad that at one point the Mexican consul in San Diego printed fliers for the Spanish-speaking population urging them, for their own safety, to "enter into no public discussion and attend no public meetings, and enter into no demonstration of any kind."

If San Diegans had lingering worries about the hundreds of Mexicans at Rosecrans, it was not reflected in the local papers. From December of 1913 to April of 1914, only two small reports about the detainees appeared. "Two Are Fined for Providing 'Bad Man's' Weed," the Sun headline read in December. "Col. Emilio Kosterlitzky...appeared in Justice Keating's court today to testify against E.A. Fisher, F.J. Estrella, and Ramón Espinosa charged with having 'marihuana,' sometimes known as Indian hemp, in their possession and providing it to the prisoners at the detention camp.

'Col. Kosterlitzky testified that the weed, when smoked, makes the smoker bloodthirsty, and he attributed several cutting scrapes among the confined Mexicans to the use of the weed.... Estrella and



Fisher pleaded guilty and were fined \$150 each. Espinosa, who is a prisoner of war, was discharged for lack of evidence."

Near the end of April a small notice in the Sun announced that Melchor Romero, a Mexican federal private, had been released from the detention camp and deported to Tijuana by U.S. immigration officers. No reason was given for this action. The story ended with

speculation that all the detainees would soon be released.

There was no report in newspapers, official fort documents, or city or county records of the first four deaths at the camp between October of 1913 and February of 1914. Three soldiers and one infant girl were quietly buried in the fort's cemetery.



files include a letter from Colonel Kosterlitzky giving some insight into his state of mind and the plight of the detainees by April of 1914. On the 14th, the colonel wrote to the Mexican consul at

Nogales, Arizona, thanking him for the release of Anselmo Bustamante, which Kosterlitzky had negotiated. Bustamante was a trusted aide to the colonel, but his family situation was dire. Kosterlitzky was less

pleased about the U.S. government's plan to release Melchor Romero, of whom he said, "he has acted very foolishly here, causing much trouble and even now is confined in the military prison at the

fort for having bribed a sentry and before this was several times punished for minor offenses.... If it is in your power, I would greatly thank you to do all in your power to have us all released. [It] is now five months that we have not received any pay whatsoever. Our position is indeed critical." He concluded with a plea for the release of another of his men whose family "is suffering in want at Nogales, Arizona, and is very deserving."

THE TUNNEL

From their earliest days

in detention, the Mexican soldiers had been praised publicly by their guards for their industriousness and willingness to work hard to build a serviceable encampment. As a result, it must have come as a shock for locals to read the frontpage headline in the April 29, 1914, issue of the Union. "MEXICAN REFUGEES ESCAPE FROM ROSECRANS." The *Sun* provided the embarrassing details. "After weeks of labor with tin can covers, sticks of wood, and other crude utensils, Mexican refugees in Ft.

Rosecrans camp completed a 225-foot tunnel from the camp.... Before discovery of the means of egress, 57 had escaped.... The camp end of it was under [an adobe stove inside a tent]. The outer end...was in the yard of the quarantine station. At one point the tunnel goes under a drain ditch 12 feet deep...

"Aurelio Gabin, a Yaqui Indian of cunning, stealth, and energy was the real maker of the tunnel. Work on it, according to information secured from [several arrested escapees], was started a month

ago.... Work was done after dark in most secret fashion. Aurelio...dug dirt and passed it to men behind him. They carried it out in their pockets, in their handkerchiefs, and in their hats. It was distributed all over the camp so evenly that evidences of it were hard to find...." Further investigation would uncover a second tunnel, not yet completed.

An amazed Captain Benteen even said, "The tunnel is one of the neatest jobs I have ever seen. The men must have worked at it constantly night after night.... In several spots reinforcements were put in with kindling wood and other makeshift supports."

For the next two days, police and the military fanned out south of the city in automobiles. They were sure the escapees were trying to reach the border. The men were on foot, without arms or money, and within several days 51 had been returned to Rosecrans, some from Point Loma and San Diego, but most were found hiding amid the rocks and scrub of Otay, Sweetwater, Palm City, and other points just above the border. Captain Benteen reassured the public that the Mexicans put up no resistance when captured. Army officials emphasized that the men had no complaint whatever to make concerning the food and clothing furnished to



them, as if the reason for the escape, after nine months of detention, was otherwise a mystery. After a few days, the detainees once again fell out of the headlines.

But Department of State files indicate that things were buzzing behind the scenes. Alarmed at the number of Mexican nationals streaming north across the border in recent months, the U.S. government wanted to know what they were doing. Were they fleeing the expanded war in the north of Mexico, or did they have more sinister

motives? In mid-September, in a series of letters, the State Department negotiated with Captain Benteen and Colonel Kosterlitzky to "put an informant around the places where the Mexicans loafed [in San Diego] to ascertain definitely what their motive was in coming here." Kosterlitzky was to choose a highly trusted detainee and send him to the city to mingle with his countrymen and gather intelligence. Although the records indicate that the colonel would comply with the request, there is no confirmation that the plan was carried out.

THE DEPARTURE

If headlines are a guide to the public consciousness, San Diegans were now consumed with war brewing in Europe, plans for the grand Panama-California Exposition in Balboa Park, and continuing rumors of war with Mexico. After months of silence about the camp, at the end of September of 1914 the Union reported, "War Department Will Hold Prisoners at Ft. Rosecrans Indefinitely." Since their arrival, Colonel Kosterlitzky had been negotiating the repatriation of his men with the U.S. administration and that of the alcoholic and unpredictable Mexican President Huerta. When the Huerta government was replaced with the interim administration of revolutionary commander Venustiano Carranza, Kosterlitzky's prospects looked even darker. How could the colonel assure the safety of soldiers who had fought the revolutionaries?

According to the Union, "[U.S.] Army officers...believe that while Washington is anxious to wash their hands of the entire Mexican situation, they will not do so until they are absolutely assured that Carranza will keep his





promise relative to kindly treatment of the interned soldiers once they are dispatched across the boundary line. Under international law, this country was obliged to care for the troops...and that same law guaranteed their safe return to their own country at the close of hostilities."

Finally, on Monday morning, September 28, the Union announced that the internees would be returned to Mexico within the week. But the soldiers made their own plea. "Because of the latest quarrel between Carranza and [Pancho] Villa which, in their opinion would render it unsafe for them to venture into Mexico at this time, many of the interned officers and men have communicated with government officials at Washington, asking that the order be

rescinded. [They] do not believe themselves safe with Villa in control of northern Mexico."

But Washington had

13 months of internment at Rosecrans, following four months at Bliss and Huachuca, the Mexicans were released. The event was acknowledged with only a small notice in the back pages of Union in early October, next to the schedules for San Diego's movie houses. "Four hundred and eighty-five Mexican infantrymen and 65 officers accompanied by their families and a choice collection of dogs, cats, and birds entrained at the east Santa Fe wharf yesterday morning...en route to Nogales and Douglas, Arizona, whence they will make their way to their homes in the state of Sonora. [The] Mexicans were transferred


from La Playa on a huge coal lighter. Two special trains of ten cars each were requisitioned to carry the prisoners....At Colton the trains will be shifted to the tracks of the Southern Pacific and from there will go over that road to Nogales." Earlier, Kosterlitzky had ensured that his men of the Gendarmería Fiscal would be released at Nogales, where they could retrieve their horses, which were their own property, not the government's. The Union article also noted that Washington calculated the bill for housing the detainees at \$75,000. In a downpour of rain, the Mexicans finally boarded the trains to go home.

Today the only reminder of the events at Ft. Rosecrans are the graves of seven Mexican soldiers and two of their children near the Ben-



nington Monument in the national cemetery. They are on a slope facing east, toward the sunrise and the homes they left in Sonora.

THE AFTERMATH

The repatriation agreement for the internees specified that officers did not have to return to Mexico but would be sent to the destination of their choice. Colonel Kosterlitzky, now 61 years old, with a lifetime of battles behind him, chose to take his family to Los Angeles. Because he spoke nine languages and was intimately

familiar with Mexico, the U.S. government had recruited him before he left San Diego as an agent for the Bureau of Investigation of the Justice Department, predecessor of the FBI. With European nations increasingly at war with one another, the prelude to World War I, the U.S. was nervous about the heavy German influence in Mexico. Kosterlitzky would spend the next 13 years undercover, posing as a German, tracking spies at West Coast ports and along the border. He died in 1928 and is buried in Calvary Cemetery in Los Angeles.

The colonel's oldest son, Ernesto, who had delivered newspapers to his neighbors as a child, returned to San Diego and lived for many years at 1360 Evergreen Street, near Cañon, on Point Loma, about a mile from where his countrymen were held in detention. He worked for Marine Products Co., San Diego importers of Mexican seafood. In an interview with Joe Stone in the San Diego Union in 1976, Ernesto declared that his family had nothing but "the happiest memories" of

the events 60 years earlier.

As for the luckless Mr. Gamble, the detainees' attorney from El Paso, he re-filed his habeas corpus suit in Los Angeles, which challenged the U.S. president's right to hold the Mexicans without formal charges being filed against them. In September of 1913, Judge Olin Wellborn agreed to hear the case (Ex Parte Toscano, 208 F. 938 [San Diego, Cal., 1913]). In early November, Judge Wellborn filed his conclusions. He sided with the government, saying that under the provisions of the Hague Treaty, executive detention of belligerents during a civil war was within the law. Gamble vowed to take the case to the Supreme Court, but the Mexicans were released before that could be done.

Nearly 90 years later, when various lawsuits were filed in U.S. courts to free the suspected Taliban and al-Qaeda detainees in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, one of the cases cited by the government defense was Ex Parte Toscano. An amicus brief filed by the ACLU in the case of one Yaser Hamdi (Hamdi v. Rumsfeld) argued that Toscano did not apply in his situation. "In Toscano, foreign soldiers were interned evidently as prisoners of war 'in honorable detention and internment' in neu-

tral territory pursuant to the express authorization of the Hague Treaty. [But] Hamdi's detention is unauthorized even if he is an enemy combatant.... As in 1913, the court's decision was for the government.

The fate of the Mexican detainees appears in no government documents or newspapers. As they passed through Nogales, Arizona, the border crossing went without a record or any special notice or official comment. ■





Herd The Homeless

I'm responding to the article about David Ross ("He Loves the People No One Wants," Cover Story, October 5). I have lived at 13th and E streets for about three years. I talk with homeless people nearly every day. I have never felt threatened by any of the homeless people. They've never been anything but friendly to me. I sometimes buy snacks or food in bulk and walk around and hand it out.

Many people on the street are not drinking, and they're not doing drugs; they simply cannot afford rent. Many have incomes from disability or odd jobs, but often it is about \$600 or less a month. It is impossible to find even a cheap downtown hotel room for that and have anything left to live on. Also, many of the homeless are mentally ill, and no one cares and no one looks after them.

The downtown police have what they call a homeless team. I say this very

tongue in cheek. I have talked to the homeless team. They claim they can help to place all the homeless people downtown. When I asked the police officers in the homeless team if they can place 2000 people this week, they stammered a little bit but said they probably could. I still don't believe When I talk to people

who have been so-called helped by the homeless team, they say they are forced or coerced into drug or alcohol rehab programs, even if they are sober, even if they don't have alcohol or drug problems. These programs are run very much like a prison, with every waking moment controlled. They don't have time to look for work, and oftentimes at the end of these programs, they are shoved back out onto the street, onto the sidewalk, literally.

The same thing goes on at Saint Vinny's. Often I hear people leave Saint Vincent's because they have no time to look for work or to go to school or do other things to improve their situation. They are kept busy, hopping every moment of the day doing one thing or another they're required to do so they can stay at Saint Vincent de Paul. I know this to be true because I've stayed in a couple of these places myself. Father Joe, I believe, is a good person, but he really needs to take a long, hard, realistic look at the help our homeless neighbors are actually receiving there.

I don't know the Water Man, David Ross, but I do know he and other people like him quietly help people who no one cares about downtown. San Diego has been herding the homeless downtown for many, many years, but now that downtown property values have soared, the homeless are supposed to evaporate. Well, they will not evaporate.

I, too, have advocated for people sleeping on the sidewalks downtown. The police wake them up at 2:00 a.m. and ticket them and move them. Why? This is cruel and pointless. If you are sleeping on the sidewalk, how do you pay a ticket? Community service?

This makes no sense more unpaid work that insures people have less food, less necessities, and even less chance of putting a roof over their heads. The attitude of the police is that they should go somewhere else. But when I asked them where else, they had no answer.

Church groups start coming about now and until about April, especially through the holiday season, handing out food, clothes, and blankets, and other things that people need, like sometimes tarps, if it is raining. I have helped out many of these groups. They all have been harassed by the police, who go about quoting stupid, pointless policies to try to force good-hearted people to stop helping. The City and the CCDC and the police, etc., could take some of the money that they spend ticketing, jailing, and harassing these people and do something helpful.

The winter shelter can and should be expanded year-round. Many a group that I have talked to has asked the City to do so. Many other churches and organizations would pay for and sponsor this. More places like Neil Good and Friend of Friend should have expanded hours. Instead, funding and hours are being cut because of official pressure and funding cuts. Why have America's Finest City officials become so heartless?

And why didn't you, the Reader, publish contact information for David Ross? Please do so. That is the very least you could do. And also publish additional information about Neil Good, so people can help if they wish to do so.

You Probably Ate Some Kelp Today

A Trip Through the Forest at Birch Aquarium

ou won't find [giant kelp] everywhere, for a couple of reasons," says Bruce Stewart, director of programs and exhibits for the Birch Aquarium at Scripps. "One, it needs to be in the right depth, commonly between 25 and 75 feet. It can't be too deep, say, over 100 feet, because it won't get enough sunlight, and if it's too shallow, it will bear the brunt

On Saturday, November 18, the Birch Aquarium presents "Kelp Kornicopia!" as one of its "Family Days" programs.

In order for kelp to get the nutrients it

requires, the water temperature must be between 5 and 20 degrees Celsius. "Kelp changes with

ocean climate, with

El Niño [which brings currents of warm water] and La Niña [which brings currents of cold]," says marine ecologist Ed Parnell. "The cold water is conducive for kelp to do quite well, but it does poorly during the warm El Niño."

Visitors to the aquarium will have the opportunity to touch algae during an interactive tank dive. "For living creatures, both plants and animals, life would be miserable without mucus," Stewart says. The mucilage created by the kelp (and most aquatic plants) protects the organism from abrasion and aids in the flexibility of its blades in the water. The abalone, a mollusk that feeds primarily on kelp, is immune to the slippery substance. "Abalone will have its foot and extend its mouth [the layer of flesh, or mantle just inside the shell], and it leaves these 'lips,' if you will, sort of out in the water; if kelp comes by and touches [this extended

part of the abalone], it gets stuck to it. You can touch this part on an abalone that it catches kelp with, and it won't do anything to your finger. But if you touch kelp and then touch [this part], it will stick like superglue." This suction is not permanent, explains Stewart. "They let go after a second, when they figure out they don't have seaweed.'

The kelp anchors itself to the rocky sea bottom with its holdfast. "The holdfast looks like a tangled root system. The individual strands of that root-like structure are called haptera, and those will reach into crevices and essentially cement themselves to the rock," Stewart explains.

"When you look at kelp from the top, like when you're fishing, it looks like a thin floating mattress of kelp; that's where I think the word 'bed' came from. But if you dive down below the canopy, or visit the aquarium, you can see the stipes, or kelp stems, which are equivalent to tree trunks. Because they're flexible, the ropelike stipes — about the diameter of your finger — can bend. Extremely strong waves can rip up kelp from their attachments, but they can withstand the most common waves."

In the past century, the health and abundance of local kelp forests — the largest of which are off the La Jolla and Point Loma shores — has not been consistent. According to the 2002 Annual Status of the Fisheries report for the California Department of Fish and Game, the annual harvest reached a high of 395,000 tons in 1918 and a low of less than 1000 tons in 1931. Until the company relocated to Scotland in the summer of 2005, nearly all of the kelp along the California coast since 1929 was harvested by Kelco (originally "Kelp Co."), which was acquired by International Specialty Products Inc. in



1998. No large-scale kelp harvesting has been conducted along the coast of California

"They would just harvest the first few feet of kelp, and the kelp would regenerate. It's a nice, sustainable industry," says Stewart. Current regulations specify that harvested kelp can be cut no deeper than four feet beneath the surface. Kelp fronds can grow up to two feet a day. Though individual fronds do not live longer than approximately nine months, the base, or holdfast, of the kelp plant can live for up to eight years.

From the kelp, companies like International Specialty Products Inc. make algin and agar. "They're stabilizers and emulsifiers," explains Stewart. "We often eat those without knowing. One common way we eat seaweed is as emulsifiers in chocolate milk and ice cream." Algin is used in cake mixes, salad dressings, frozen foods, and canned foods, as well as nonedible products like cosmetics and building materials. According to the Encyclopedia of Alternative Medicine, kelp contains about 30 minerals and is rich in iodine, calcium, sulfur, and silicon. Kelp is sometimes

used as a dietary supplement for people with mineral deficiencies.

"I wouldn't think you could survive on kelp solely," says Stewart. "Just like you can't get all of your nutritional needs only from beans and rice. But I don't think it would hurt you. My friend Steve once saw a guy collecting sea palms [another brown seaweed] and asked, 'What are you collecting them for?' and the guy said, 'I boil them and eat them with mayonnaise.' Steve asked, 'What do they taste like?' and the guy answered, 'Mayonnaise.'

Atmospheric Ice-Crystal Effects

can often be seen, starting about this time of year, because of the frequent appearance of high clouds made of tiny bits of ice. The most familiar of these optical effects is the 22°-radius halo, or ring, around the sun or the moon. Less often seen is a "corona" (a colored disk around the sun or moon — not the same as the solar corona seen during total eclipse); "sundogs" (colored arcs left and right of the sun); the sun pillar (a vertical column of light above the rising or setting sun); and a host of other rare and inconspicuous optical

phenomena. All of the optical effects mentioned are a consequence of sunlight or moonlight refracting through or reflecting from the tiny facets of ice crystals in cirrus and other types of high clouds.

Liquidambar Trees, or sweet gums, the deciduous trees gracing front yards, parks, and campuses throughout the San Diego area, should put on a colorful show this month. The leaves of some varieties turn to purple or red; the leaves of other varieties fade to golden yellow. Still other varieties hold on to their green leaves until sometime in December. Most liquidambars in our area regain their light green foliage by late February.

The Leonid Meteor Shower,

famous for its outbursts over the past several years, is expected to settle down to a modest display of only about 10-20 visible events per hour (as seen under clear, dark skies) on the early mornings of Friday, November 17, and Saturday, November 18. The best viewing time is during the several hours before dawn. The crescent moon will rise before dawn on those mornings, but its slight glare will not significantly affect meteor observations. All Leonid meteors seem to radiate from the constellation of Leo, which at this time of year lies high in the south at dawn.



asy trail hiking, then moderate boulder hopping, and finally some strenuous, knee-deep wading will take you deep into the sublime hideaway of the Royal Gorge, a narrow, rock-walled section of the Arroyo Seco canyon that has repelled trail builders for well over a century. There you'll come upon a small waterfall and a deep, dark, swimmable pool — a "Royal Pool" or "King's Bathtub," if you will.

Begin hiking at a parking area and trailhead at mile 26.4 on Angeles Crest Highway (2 miles north of Interstate 210). Step around the locked gate and descend

1 mile on a paved service road to reach the Gabrielino Trail, just upstream from Gould Mesa Campground. Follow the Gabrielino Trail upstream (north) along the Arrovo Seco stream past Oakwilde Trail Camp (3.6 miles) and to the point where the Gabrielino Trail leaves Arroyo Seco itself and starts going up a tributary called Long Canyon (4.7 miles). Abandon the trail at this point and start boulder hopping up the main stream to the right — this is Royal Gorge. (Note: Forget about forging ahead to the waterfall and pool if the first couple of creek crossings are difficult. That would indicate the water level is too high for safe passage. High water will likely occur during and after one or more of the winter storms to come this year.)

6.0 miles) a section of the gorge where the sheer walls pinch in tight. Clamber over some boulders and wade through a couple of pools to reach the Royal Pool ahead. The pool is fed by water sliding about 8 feet down a 45-degree incline and then cascading 10 feet almost vertically. The rock-bound pool measures about 50 feet long, 30 feet wide, and 10 feet deep at the middle.

Don't try climbing around the falls to reach the continuation of the gorge above the falls. The rock of the San Gabriel Mountains is aged, and particularly around here it's literally falling apart.

It is possible to approach the upper lip of the falls from the upstream side (about a 90-minute walk and boulder hop from Switzer Picnic Area), but there's

no easy or safe way to descend into the pool itself from there.

'You write with such clarity and simplicity, and it's so penetrating. Water for Elephants was acquired and edited by Chuck Adams for Algonquin Book, and has really done well. It's in a 14th printing with 225,000 copies in print, and made all the bestseller lists, including number 7 on The New York Times. Perhaps even more telling is that 178 Amazon customers gave it personal rave reviews; that's got to be a record. Is it true that the novel was inspired by a photograph you saw in the Chicago Tribune?"

"Yes, it accompanied an article about a photographer named Edward J. Kelty. He followed traveling circuses in the 1920s and '30s. He built his own camera that could take negatives that were 12 by 24 inches, so you can imagine the level of detail. He took enormous panoramic shots of the entire Big Top, all the employees of the Ringling Brothers,

and you could see just every spangle, every sequin."

"Did you know a lot about circuses before you got into this project?"

"I had never been to a circus before. I had no interest, no connection. None. It was completely this picture. I had been planning on starting another novel the next day and I was sitting with my cup of tea and just started stabbing the photograph with my finger, exclaiming, 'There's a novel in that!' And my husband was groaning, 'Oh, no.' Because we had just done research for this other book. I just couldn't rip my eyes off the photo, and immediately ordered Kelty's [pictorial book]."

"By sheer dumb luck one of my writer friends is married to an ex-elephant handler who worked at the KC Zoo until he was gored by one of the elephants. I just wanted to sit outside the enclosure and watch them, to see how they move and get the body language downight. So we went there and Mark called to Penny, one of the elephants he'd known, and she remembered him and came over and purred, and that was really neat."

"And afterward," I prompt, "you connected with another elephant at Circus World in Baraboo, Wisconsin."

"I had the story of Mark's getting gored freshly in my head,

so when they said I could go in and actually meet an elephant, I stood at her shoulder and was shaking. I was scared to touch her. I mean, she was eleven feet tall. I gave her a pat and said, 'Thank you!' and went away. On a later visit, I was handed a bucket of peanuts. The handler opened the enclosure, I went in, and he closed the door behind me. And there I was, alone with this African elephant and a bucket of peanuts. She was as baffled as I was. But she turned out to be such an affectionate love bug that I lost all fear of her. And at the end she gave me a sock puppet with her trunk and was really sweet."





they like you — they throw you off while the train slows to pass by a railway yard. You can see the red light of the yard and find your way back to town. A courtesy, if you will. But if they don't like you...."

"And all this culminated in you picking for your novel a male narrator who is 93." Sara laughs. "I wanted to flex my writing muscles a bit, yeah. I was a little worried that I was getting pigeonholed as a women's fiction writer. And so I thought, what's the thing I can do" — she laughs again — "that can guarantee nobody will look at this as women's fiction."

"Did you study writing? Did you always want to be a writer?"

"I never studied writing. I studied literature but as a reader. And yes, I always did."

'This was in the Midwest?" "No, I'm Canadian, from Ottawa mostly. I was there for ten years and went to Carleton University. I spent most of my life in Ontario. I finished school (what are you going to do with an English degree?) and wangled my way into a job writing online manuals and help systems, and I documented everything from statistical software to data mapping. Then I moved to the States for a tech writing job and met my husband. Two years later they laid me off, so I decided to write novels.

"How did you and your husband wind up in what is described as an 'environmentalist community' north of Chicago?"

"He had known about it and, when we got together, we went looking for a house. We investigated the community and decided, 'wow, this is paradise.' It has stables, a school, and its own organic farm."

"Are you required to work on it?"

"You're supposed to, yes."
"I understand the houses are energy efficient?"

"Our house is one of the first ones built; they became more energy efficient as they went. We have some leaky windows but once we get those fixed..."

"And it's a community, it's not a commune."

"Right, a community."
"Did vour children grow

"Did your children grow up there?"

"One was one and the other was five when I moved from Canada. So, yes, this is where they grew up."

"Will they have dual citizenship?"

"Yeah, they do. So do I."
"And your next book is going to star animals as well."

"Bonobo apes, yes, a family group. It's going to be set in the present day."

"You wrote an 11-page letter to your agent, Emma Sweeney, and she used it to sell your fourth and fifth books. She actually held an auction based on those 11 descriptive pages. (It ended Monday, Oct. 30.) How did she break the news to you about how it went?"

"She called me and asked if I was sitting down."

"And informed you that it (and the following book) had gone to Cindy Spiegel at Spiegel & Grau, part of Random House, Inc., arguably the top editor in the industry. She was the highest bidder at 5.1 million dollars. Did you have any idea of what was coming?"

"No."

"And were you sitting down?"

"I've adopted ten infant Bonobos at the Lola Ya Bonobo Sanctuary in the Congo."

"I was and I'm glad, because to be honest I think I lost all feeling in my limbs at that moment."

"How is this stunning news going to change your life? What did your husband say, what did your kids say? "

"The kids don't know anything and I don't want them to know anything. I don't know if this is the reaction I would have guessed I'd have, but my thought right now is that I don't want anything to change. I want to put it away and not touch it. I want to pretend that it's not there. I think the way to keep my head about it is to sort of carry on as normal."

"Do you miss Canada? Do

those cold plains call to you?"

"Oh, yes. Definitely. I've been back recently and I'm going at the end of this month to do a reading and actually go and talk to some guys at York University about the Bonobo apes. I've adopted ten infant Bonobos at the Lola Ya Bonobo Sanctuary in the Congo. I hope my book can raise enough awareness to help keep them from extinction. I'm so looking forward to getting into this next novel. The research is going to be incredibly fascinating. I actually hope to be able to come away from this talking about the time I spoke with an ape."







Dogged for Dough This year, Green Day's "Boulevard of Broken Dreams" won the Song of the Year Grammy, which may have helped push

Warner Bros. reached a settlement three months ago with Surfdog Records and the former members of Agent 51.

"Surfdog got most of the money," according to the source, who said that band members got about \$20,000 each. A call to the office of Green Day manager Pat Magnarella yielded no



sales of their 2004 album *American Idiot* over the five-million mark. The song also

paid off for the former members of Agent 51, a nowdefunct local band.

A year before the release of American Idiot, Encinitasbased

Surfdog Records released Agent 51's CD *The Red and the Black*. The album had a song titled "She's My Heroine." The opening guitar line has a strong resemblance to the prominent guitar riff in "Boulevard of Broken Dreams."

In February, Surfdog president Dave Kaplan denied the existence of legal action between his indie label and Green Day/Warner Bros. However, a source recently disclosed that Green Day and response. An e-mailed query to Kaplan was not answered. The earliest Green

Day/Agent 51 connection goes back to early 2001, when the local Poway pop-punk band was signed to Adeline Records, a Bay Area—based label launched by Green Day front man Billy Joe Armstrong.



Zero Tolerance, 50,000 Volts "In the midst of setting up our equipment, [bassist] Travis [Du Bois] was being escorted outside by a campus police

officer," says Suffer the Heat singer Brandon Barclay of the band's Halloween gig at MiraCosta College.

"Travis had and still has no idea why he was being arrested, so he asked the officer 'why' about 20 times and never got a response. A second cop comes in and starts yelling at the crowd gathered around the scene to disperse. They end up telling Travis that they want to check him for weapons....

"As soon as they cranked his arm up behind his back, he flinched due to discomfort and was body-slammed to the ground and Taser-



restricted his arms from any movement and kept Tasing him because he wouldn't put his arms behind his back."

School officials declined to comment on the incident but did provide the preliminary police report that states the campus police officer approached Du Bois outside because he "smelled marijuana smoke." The officer stated that Du Bois "drew attention to himself" by walking away. The officer followed Du Bois into the building, where he "detected alcohol" on the bassist's breath and decided to "conduct a weapon and/or alcohol search.

"Standard procedure" dictates putting handcuffs on suspects during such searches; the officer stated Du

Bois "refused to cooperate." When a second officer arrived, a struggle began, and the second officer "discharged a Taser into [Du Bois's] back." Du Bois was taken into custody and charged with public drunkenness, resisting arrest, and possessing alcohol on school grounds ("a bottle of Blue Vodka").

"The bottle was a mini two-ouncer, and it was still sealed," says Barclay. "It was

for after the show. But because he also admitted having two beers before the show — during dinner, off campus — they say he was breaking the law. What about burning nine inches of Taser marks onto an innocent guy's flesh?"

The MCC campus has a "zero tolerance" alcohol policy. Since February, the campus newspaper has included at least three articles regarding the possession of Tasers by campus police.

"I Hate the Government," says

Aaron Ballenger, singer/guitarist with Buddah Grinder. Ballenger worked at the OBD (Ocean Beach Dispensary) until July 6, when it was raided for dispensing medical marijuana.

"I'm 21 years old, and now I'm a felon," says

Ballenger, whose sentencing date is in December. "I had to plead guilty. If I didn't, I would have had to come up with thousands of dollars to fight the government in court."

Ballenger started working at OBD last fall.

"I wanted to work there because it was air-conditioned, it paid decently, and it was near my house. Plus, I was working for a cause that supported the revolution of decriminalizing marijuana for medical purposes.... Dispensaries are very necessary. You need professionals like me who can deliver medical marijuana in a safe and reliable environment."

Jason Kaufman operated OBD, which was located near the corner of Voltaire Street and Catalina Boulevard. He

says he will reopen next month and sell clothing and vinyl records.

"I'll have to alter the name because we were a nonprofit," says Kaufman.

"We want to cater to DJs. We want to carry pro audio equipment. We still have a lot to resolve [following the raid]. We have

a lot of bills....

"In Northern California they would have revoked

your business license. They would have said, 'We don't want you here, please shut down.' Here they used some of the best cops in San Diego that were cross-deputized as DEA agents and raided us. Channel 10 showed up ten minutes later. How can you fight that?"

The contest reportedly received over 600 entries. The winning entry will be on the soundtrack to the upcoming Stomp the Yard film.

"We were hoping this contest could lead to our big break to get a record deal," says Orange, a pizza-delivery driver who also performs at parties as a Michael Jackson impersonator.

"They spoke in tongues

and rolled on the floor," says Thomas. "We didn't handle snakes, but we did everything else.... I used to love going to church. I loved everything about it — the music, the fellowship, hanging out with my relatives and friends, the food after church.'

Yet, Thomas balked last year when his friend asked him to sing at a Lutheran church in Minnesota.

"I refused to go into a building where people are going to call me names," says Thomas (who is gay). "Their opinion of what God wanted didn't work for me.... I grew up knowing that I was equal to everyone except when I went to church.'

Thomas eventually agreed to sing at the Lutheran church.

"It was a paying gig. When I got there and actually sang, I got this tremendous feeling of joy; everything that Christians are always telling you you can get, like joy and peace — I got it. I really got it. People started crying and so did I."

The experience moved Thomas to record Plantation Gospel, a 17-song collection of 300-year-old spirituals.

"We only used instruments that would have been found on the plantation, like violin, banjo, piano, acoustic guitar, and human voices....

"The only sadness I have is that my mom and grandma never got to hear me sing this music. My grandmother wanted me to be a gospel singer. I hadn't sung in church since 1985, at my grandma's funeral. This music has brought me peace. I made peace with my whole life. It's not about religion; it's about peace.'

Earl Thomas, who divides his time between San Diego







Laurence Juber was 11 years old when the Beatles broke free of working-class pub obscurity and became teen idols with their appearance on *The Ed Sullivan Show*. Here, we called it the British Invasion; I've no idea what they called it in the UK where Juber grew up, but the music and the hysteria surrounding the Fab Four did not go unnoticed. Twenty-five years later, Juber would be employed by one of the Beatles.

Despite the explosion of rock in the '60s, Juber continued to listen to the music that interested him most — complicated stuff by Django Reinhardt and Julian Bream. Jazz guitar had more of an impact on Juber's

sound than any one Invasion band. Although Juber would win his first Grammy award for a rock-guitar solo, his second would come for an instrumental version of the *Pink Panther* theme that he contributed to a Henry Mancini compilation.

Juber is a master of acoustic finger style, but with less of the trick-guitar mishmash that seems obligatory among the highoctane pickers. He has a fluid style that shifts gears through simultaneous jazzy chording, leads, and bass lines, while weaving in and


out of musical thoughts faster than a Formula One racer.

Now an L.A.-area session guitarist, Juber has been making artful solo instrumental records since 1990. I almost don't want to mention that he played lead guitar in Wings, since his own music is so different. It's as

The sounds of British post-punk have been all over the place in the past few years, whether it's in modern guises like Franz Ferdinand, the Futureheads, and Bloc Party, or in prerevolutionary France (the Gang of Four figures prominently in the soundtrack to Marie Antoinette). But some important things are missing: the original movement's emphasis on sexual politics and its Jamaican influences. It's fitting that the Slits should come back now to remind us.

The Slits were almost literally the children of the original wave of British punk singer Ari Up, who was all of 14 when the Slits began, is the stepdaughter of John Lydon, a.k.a. Johnny Rotten. And they took punk's aesthetic of amateurism to heart, recording their debut album when they knew no more than a handful of chords and going on tour when they still needed the Clash's Mick Jones to tune their guitars for them.

But as the Slits got their act together, they began to leave loud punk rock behind. Rather than bashing away, they started to play minimally. basing their songs around reggae rhythms and topping them with Up's yelping vocals.

Other female or partly female bands — LiLiPUT, the Delta 5, the Au Pairs, the Raincoats — were heading in similar directions at the same time, but the Slits went farther than any of them away from rock and funk. In the theory-heavy rock criticism of the time, the Slits were seen as rejecting patriarchal



Western culture. Famously, they appeared on an album cover wearing nothing but loincloths and mud, as though they were rejecting even civilization itself.

Some of this album sounds

like early-'70s protest rock or nature rock. There are

little clips of President Bush

sings lyrics about purple skies, tree roots, and rain-soaked ground. Other songs are a little grittier, like an angrier version of Eric Burdon and the Animals. The guitar on these tracks is a little edgier, straightforward, and rocking, but some chord transitions are sloppy and miss the drumbeat by a hair. The background singing

is reminiscent of Crosby, Stills, and Nash. You see where this is going? It's old rock, not great rock, and rock that ignores the past 30 years of musical progression. It might soothe the savage hippies at Winstons, but IU's not going further than that. I'll give it to them for sticking with the basics, but if you're going to go with simple form, you need to offer a lot of spirit. IU never gets out of second gear, and they only emulate



an era (late '60s to '70s) instead of mastering their instruments and offering something new.

Their final song — before a "secret" 13th track - is their best and deviates from the rest of the album by being a stand-alone acoustic guitar track with sincere vocals and





Mister Natural

Christian Graves, the new chef at J-Six, is proud to be a card-carrying Slow Foodie. If you haven't heard about it yet, "Slow Food" doesn't mean you'll have an hour's wait for your appetizers, or that everything's stewed — although it *is* the opposite of mass-produced, unhealthy fast food, a movement dedicated to preserving traditional ways of farming, cooking, and caring for our food and planet. A serious side effect: wholesome, tasty fare.

The Slow Food movement started in Italy, and Alice Waters was the first to practice it in an American restaurant (Chez Panisse). It begins at ground level with saving and growing diverse heirloom seeds, rather than buying sterile, patented commercial hybrids from mega-corporations. It includes farming with organic and sustainable growing methods in place of pesticide drenchings, and raising animals naturally and humanely (for better flavor and healthfulness, as well as contented cows). It encourages contact between the growers and the cooks (e.g., at farmers' markets) and choosing fresh local products as much as possible, rather than foods shipped from half a world away. And it involves supporting products made by small-scale artisans, ranging from honeys to handcrafted hams to cheeses and honest breads.

At J-Six, the kitchen bakes the breads, chef Graves cures charcuterie and makes sausages, and the friendly, knowledgeable waitstaff serves gently reared free-range meats and local produce. (We're lucky in San Diego, surrounded by farms with a year-round growing season. It must be tough to be a Slow Food maven during a Minneapolis winter.)

Stepping into J-Six is like entering a theater where the play's in progress, the bar and open kitchen stage sets with a golden glow. The dimly lighted dining room snakes around them, divided into more intimate areas by tall, plush sound-absorbing booths, which keep the noise level painless. Mike and Scott were with us, and Mike ran around the room like a kid, testing the comfort of the different banquettes (he liked them all) and barely resisting the temptation to horn in like Harpo Marx on a couple cuddled in a rounded floral shell of a booth. In the area where we were seated, the decor runs off in three different directions: The ceiling has upsidedown white foam flowers, like a fake Italian palazzo; one wall is hung with strips of translucent round beads resembling a Filipino capiz-shell curtain; another wall is mysteriously bedecked with dozens



of identical Moroccan fezzes hanging from pegs. "My father hates the decor," said our waitress, who seemed to have a family connection to the place. "He didn't like it when they were putting it up, and he doesn't like it any better now."

The menu has a more coherent diversity. It's divided into "small plates—starters," "large plates," and "share bites" of appetizers or cocktail noshes serving two to six—plus

a few side dishes. (Unlike a steakhouse, entrées come with veggies, so the sides are meant as extras.) The table breads are a light olive-and-herb loaf and a denser red-pepper bread, served with a spread of Kalamata olives, sun-dried tomatoes, and olive oil that you ladle on with a spoon. "Talk about addictive — I can't stop eating this," said my partner.

As a foursome dining "family style," our attention went straight to the "share" plates. We began with a trio of summer salads. There were heirloom tomatoes with fresh mozzarella, a standard dish on local menus but distinguished here by luscious green-ripe tomatoes with a light pesto beneath them. I loved the cantaloupe and prosciutto, another conventional combination, improved by a garnish of red onion slivers and a lemon verbena gastrique. A

block of herbed French feta surrounded with diced cucumbers and onions lacked something, though. "This is like the dressing on a Greek pita sandwich, minus the yogurt," Mike observed.

We couldn't pass up a platter of the chef's house-

made assortment of charcuterie. The juicy unsmoked sausage, similar to fresh Italian sausage, was plated over coarse-ground mustard. We loved it, but I was even fonder

of the thinly sliced, mild bresaola (cured beef) — tender and pleasing wrapped around crunchy cooked green beans dressed in tarragon crème fraîche. The smoked ham turned out to be house-cured duck prosciutto, made from the plump breast of a Moularde (foie gras) duck.

We turned our attention to the "small plates," which were not so small. First arrival: steamed Manila clams in a deep bowl filled with a salty, complex broth of seafood stock and tomatoes topped with crumbled house-made chorizo (a bit bland); bread fingers perched on the edge of the bowl. "This is the perfect sharing dish," said Mike. "Lots of bread and sauce and flavor." "And if you tackled this whole thing by yourself," Scott added, "you wouldn't want an entrée." As we worked our way through the dish,

we experimented with the table breads for dipping. The red-pepper bread had the right stuff.

The showpiece of the meal was a plate of truffled white-corn ravioli with butter-sautéed, whole, fresh, chanterelle mushrooms (yeah — fresh, not dried, and what a difference!) aswim in a chive and lemon fondue, which proved to be a luxurious but not-too-heavy cream sauce. My first raviolus was perfect, bursting with the sweetness of slow-roasted Chino Farms corn. The second was undercooked,

the pasta thicker than expected. But the filling was so devastating, it could have been wrapped in paper towels and I'd barely have noticed — definitely one of the year's best bites.

At this point, nearly done with our starters, we took to wiping the platters. "This is the first place we've gone with you where we're using the bread to sop up the last of the sauces," said Scott. "Usually, halfway through and that's enough." "Right," said Mike. "We're like starving Third World children lapping it up."

'Our seafood is the freshest in town," the waitress told us as we were choosing entrées. "The fish was cut five minutes before the doors opened." The signature dish, she said, is the seared sea scallops. We tried them, and sorry to say, they didn't taste all that sparkling. Although not phosphated or otherwise mistreated, they were nearly flavorless — cut today, perhaps, but probably caught a couple of days before. They were overshadowed by the accompaniments — a fondue of "box shucked" corn (rasped from the cobs on a box-grater, with all their sugary juices), dotted with English peas and ricotta gnocchi. The naked cheese gnocchi (in Italian, they're called gnudi, like "nudie," because they're like ravioli filling without the pasta skins) were tender and tiny all two of them. (I got the plate first, and I counted.)

A thick hunk of grilled Hawaiian ahi was well done on the surface, rare at the center, but even the reddest core tasted more like albacore than like ahi (which is usually yellowfin). Instead of ahi's near-beefy flavor, the impact was closer to cooked pork. (Maybe it was "the other white meat" of the sea?) It came with a red wine gastrique with thick batons of good smoked bacon. undercooked white beans, and lemon-braised baby artichokes of uneven doneness - some soft, some on the tough side. (What's with the hard white beans I'm running into all over town? The better the restaurant, the harder the beans — did some New York celebrity chef declare them de rigueur? If Mario jumps off a cliff, do you have to jump off it, too?)

Oddly - given the chef's previous stint at San Francisco's famed and fabulous Farallon seafood restaurant — things went much better with the beef dishes. Braised Angus short ribs are the menu's sole holdover from previous chef Deborah Schneider. The boneless beef is slow-baked for three hours with rosemary, garlic, and Chianti. Great flavors and a delicious gravy are the high points, but the casserole's liquid content should probably have been attended to more closely during baking, as the texture was a tad dried out. Alongside are ricotta-whipped potatoes, which take some getting used to. The lean ricotta modifies the rooty flavor of the potato, producing refinement in place of earthiness.

rare, and so it arrived, well-browned on the surface and juicy inside. It's naturally raised meat from Brandt Beef, grass-fed until the final stages when it's switched to conventional corn for fattening up. Grilled over a gas flame, it comes with fine accompaniments — a salad of tomatoes (including those great green-ripe ones served with the salad plate), green beans, and, best of all, Point Reyes goat

cheese, a perfect, tangy comple-

We ordered our rib-eye steak

ment to the steak. Although none of our main courses quite lived up to the promise of the starters, this was the favorite entrée of our table. We wished we had one more person with us, though, so we could also try the brickroasted organic chicken, made with prized little black-skinned Jidoris.

I took advantage of a threewine white flight. (Whenever I write "white flight," I want to make real estate jokes, but...never mind.) It included a Coppola Pinot Grigio (a dishwater blonde), a good Spanish Albariño, and the star, a Te Awa Sauvignon Blanc from Hawk's Bay, New Zealand. Unlike the Marlborough-grown Sauvignons from that country, it wasn't dry and citrusy, but a rich mouthful, great with clams and scallops. A glass of Melville Viognier proved full bodied enough to hold its own not only with the meaty ahi but against the rib-eye. Scott tried the red flight and evidently liked it, since he kept it all to himself.

We managed to try some desserts, all house-made. Best was a molten lava cake that was more like a lava cupcake—short, round, and flattened. It was small enough to please without cloying, lightened with a scoop of Tahitian vanilla ice cream and a shallow pool of devilishly delicious pistachio-studded crème anglaise.

Vanilla panna cotta in plum "soup" topped with candied lemon zest and mint leaves was a little heavy and custardy for my taste. (I prefer panna cottas as airy as you can get 'em.) Last and least was a very moist crustless pumpkin cheesecake, tasting sweet and creamy but nothing more. "Maybe the current pumpkin shortage affected this dessert," said Mike. "There wasn't enough pumpkin to get any into the cheesecake." On the

other hand, the house coffee is a superb dark French roast called La Colombe. If you prefer weak American breakfast coffee, don't order it, and I'll drink your share.

To review I-Six without a side

trip to the rooftop J-Bar lounge would be criminal. To avoid arrest, we returned to explore. They've got a swimming pool up there, and firepits, heat stanchions, some tented cabanas that groups can reserve for bottle service, and open-air tables with a view of the construction equipment raising more surrounding condos. If you choose a table close to the elevator, a server will demand and hold your credit card until you're ready to pay up — evidently they've experienced some misdemeanor escapees. We arrived during happy hour (4:30-6:30 p.m.). Half the patrons were filtering in after work to meet friends, some still in office drag, others in more casual wear. One large, young group were hotel patrons evidently vacationing from a colder climate. They clustered around a fire pit wearing tank tops and cut-offs on a chilly (for San Diego) November evening.

But we were there for the food, just the food, ma'am. Fried calamari were a credit to their race - small rings and lovely little tentacles, crisp and succulent in a light batter that wasn't oversalted. They came with lemon wedges and a smart and tasty mayo-free tartar sauce based on thick Greek-style yogurt dotted with diced house-pickled vegetables. A Hawaiian-style pulled pork sandwich offered flavorful (if fatty) premium pork strips in fruity sweet-sour sauce on a bun, accompanied by house-made kettle chips. And knowing we could trust the beef, we ordered a rare burger "with everything" (avocado, bacon, grilled onions, cheddar). Thick and juicy, it met expectations and came with thick frites that had shared their frying oil with the branches of fresh rosemary that garnished the plate. The ketchup was lively, amended with something bright and tangy that I couldn't quite identify. (Other J-bar dishes include skewers of chicken or skirt steak, a mini-pizza, grilled shrimp, and various sandwiches.) A frozen Mango Piña Colada, sweet and suave, resembled an alcoholic smoothie and made us wish that summer were just beginning.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Christian Graves became executive chef at J-Six about six months ago, after cooking at many of San Francisco's top restaurants, including five years as chef de cuisine at Farallon, a famed downtown fish house. Graves spent his childhood in the South, but his peripatetic parents moved to San Francisco by the time he reached his teens. He started his career as a dishwasher in local restaurants, until a chef let him start doing prep. "I loved cooking, and when I finally decided to go to school for it, my family were very supportive and confused as to why I hadn't figured out earlier that this was what I wanted to do. I went to a junior college in Santa Barbara and the city college where they have a hotel-restaurant program. Meanwhile, I was working in restaurants. That's where I started to get a lot of love and knowledge. I worked for a really good guy who was really into teaching me, and I was hungry for knowledge as well."

Why did he leave one of San Francisco's top restaurants to come to San Diego? "J-Six was a perfect fit," he says. "I'd worked with seafood at Farallon. I'd been at Aqua and One Market and Roti. I kind of specialized in fish. My friend, Jim Birnbaum, who's a famous chef, was helping [Bill] Kimpton [of Kimpton Hotel Group, owners of Hotel Solamar and other boutique hotels] with trying to find placements for this restaurant, and it was such a natural fit for me. My wife's parents live in Orange County and we wanted to be closer to them, so my family and I, with two little boys, moved down.

"At J-Six, we're really trying to change the whole restaurant. My style of food is very different from the previous chef. I'm trying to do everything in-house. We make our own breads, pickles, our own charcuterie. We're trying to do as much as possible with organic ingredients and definitely hand-selected ingredients. I'm not trying to break the sound barrier with food — I'm humble. I'm really into solid food. I like classic techniques as well as classic ingredients. I'm really into Slow Food, which to me is about using all-natural ingredients and traditional techniques. I use produce from local farms as much as possible and a small-scale meat vendor who can select carefully because he's not buying masses of fillets. I love food, fresh food. I love family and celebrations with food and with each other, and I love cooks who cook. One of the best things about San Diego is that the chefs here are really interested in each other's work and support each other — it's not a competitive, cutthroat thing like San Francisco can be.

"The thing with J-Six is, we really want to be a neighborhood restaurant — we want to be like those San Francisco places where you can go again and again. I miss just dropping in to places like Chez Panisse Café and Zuni and Oliveto in the Bay Area, and that's what we want to be to San Diego."

Lord of the Tacos

If it's done right, the bubbling cheese cements the tortillas together.

o," says Carla. "I trust you."
Uh-oh. Warning flags. You know the rule: Never trust a woman when she says she trusts you.

But I'm being straight with her here. I want

to learn the *quebradita*, the Mexican break dance that, from what I've seen, is a better workout than a couple of hours at your fanciest gym. Somebody told me the other day that down at the southern end of Chula Vista there's a, like, lobster place where they also have dancing, traditional Mexican stuff.

So I suggested, all cards on the table, that we go down, right? Together, tonight, to dance.

"Bedford! I'm still limping from the damned broken leg.... Hello? Anybody there?"

But...then she says to go.

So here I am, around 11:00 p.m., outside this cream-colored stucco place surrounded by palms and banana-type trees. The sign says, "Baja Lobster. Dancing Nightly." Inside's plush, red leather, long bar. Looks good, except nobody's dancing. Guy sings onstage, not too well. Karaoke. In Spanish. "Come back Friday, or Saturday," says the guy behind the bar, Herman. But when I explain I want to learn the *quebradita*, he says, "Try the Marisol, on Main. They have girls can teach you there."

Ho-kay. Need time to think. Back outside, I spot this cone-shaped, grass-roofed place on the corner. Looks brand-new. Very Baja. Irony is,

going in, two glass doors swish open automatically, and there you are — outside. A half-circle of tables, with a half-circle black marble counter and half a dozen cool stools, a single pipe curved up to hold a footrest and the padded seat. Also

way-cool, a mural of the Baja desert on the back wall, with buzzards, cattle skulls, saguaros, and the words "Baja Taco Shack" daubed in, plus, above your head, a Baja 1000 VW maxing out on its shocks and a half-moon ceiling painted with more buzzards, cruising the air currents this time, along

with gulls and pelicans. But coolest of all is the feeling of being inside a massive palapa...
"Señor? Sir. You have to order at the counter."

Uh, oh, right. This is an über-cool gal named — Lord! — Carla. She walks me back to the cashier's counter at the entrance. They have a list of tacos posted above.

It's fairly basic, but good prices. Mostly from \$1.50 to \$3.00. Carne asada (beef), al pastor (pork), or *tripa* (tripe) are all \$1.50. Then they have *mulitas* — little mules. Carla here says *mulitas* are two crispy corn tortillas with meat, cheese, and *guaca*. If it's done right, the bubbling cheese cements the tortillas together.

Then again, I could get a crispy taco dorado deshebrada, with its shredded beef, \$1.50, or a taco "à la New York" (with unsliced carne asada, says Carla), \$3.00.

But now a couple of people are waiting behind me, so I just go for whatever tickles my fancy: an *al pastor*, 'cause I know I like that, and lessee, a *taco dorado de papa*, 'cause a crispy taco with potato sounds good, and, uh, okay, *elote asado* (\$2.00). I embarrass myself by having to have Carla remind me that *elote* is grilled corn on the cob with butter. "You've lived how long now in this border town?" I mumble to myself.

I go sit at the counter on one of those cool stools, while Tony the manager brings out the food, plus two salsas, limes, spiced carrots, and red onions. The potato taco I could wolf a dozen of. It has a creamy, cilantroish sauce with the potato. Tony says he sells more of these than anything. The pork is beautiful in the al pastor, and the corn comes with its husk still attached, so you can hold it while you eat. I grab a bottle of Sangría, a nonalcoholic but winey-tasting drink in a winey-looking bottle (\$1.50). I ask Tony which is the best salsa to put on the corn. "Neither," he says, and brings me a bottle of Tapatía hot sauce. 'This is what you want." And the man's right. Just a little gives the corn the kick it needs to make it, well, Mexican.

Now, of course, I have time to look at the list without pressure. Here's what I regret *not* pick-

ing. (Sigh.) For starters, the *Combinación Baja*, a three-taco combo (carne asada, tripe, and pork) plus a *chile pasilla con queso*, smoky Oaxacan pasilla chile stuffed with cheese and grilled, all for \$5.50. Then the *mulita*. And last, *taco de lengua*, today's (Wednesday) special, just because I'd like to someday learn to enjoy tongue without picturing it in its old job.

It turns out that Baja Tacos is only around three months old. That VW in the mural belongs to Marcos, the owner. (He and his family run both this restaurant and the Baja Lobster dance outfit next door.) "He wanted to make this look like a real Baja place," Tony says, "so he brought an artist up from Mexicali and had him paint a Baja Mil scene — with Marco's car in it. He competes."

Man, I'm reluctant to leave. I'd party here, even though there's no grog. It's hip, it's Baja, it's — hey — Baja-hip.

But now — drum roll, please — *el momento de verdad.* This *quebradita* thing. Should I go down to Marisol on Main for lessons? I can still hear Carla's voice: "Go. I trust you." Right, until I come back with my teacher's scent all over me. That's how it'd be with the *quebradita*.

Oh God. Decisions, decisions. ■

Exams for Sommeliers

"If you're not here, if you're not following the format, you're sort of holding everybody up."

isa Redwine, general manager and wine director at Molly's in the downtown Marriott, hands a sheet of paper to Dan Chapman, a captain at George's at the Cove. "Are these examples of questions you'd see on the certified, or

are these more advanced-level?" Redwine will take the Society of Wine Educators' exam to become a certified specialist in wine on December 11. Chapman has already passed the advanced-level exam—the second hurdle on the road to becoming a master sommelier. "These are more advanced-level."

"These are more advanced-level," answers Chapman. "'What is the newest Grand Cru of Alsace?' — that's a good one. Is that the one that's a Sylvaner?"

It's something you might very well need to know. Besides the name of the new Grand Cru, the question asks what varietals are allowed, the percentages permitted in blending, the village, and why it has never been classified as a Grand Cru in the past, "even though it was always considered one of the true Grand Crus."

Megan Burgess, GM at Roppongi and corporate sommelier for the Sammy's restaurant group, tells Redwine that when she took the certified exam, "There were a ton of questions on Australia. I'd say almost a third of the test. Questions along the lines of, 'Which of the following is not an appellation in Southern Australia?' "

Redwine, Chapman, and Burgess are three

members of a sommelier tasting group that has been meeting every Monday for the past six months in order to prepare for either the certified or advanced (or even master) sommelier exams. The other members: Paul Krikorian, sommelier

at the La Jolla Country Club; and Catherine Henson, national accounts rep for the Henry Wine Group. (Henson, because she doesn't work on the service side of the business, is aiming to become a master of wine — a degree with a more academic emphasis — instead of a master sommelier.)

"For the certified exam," explains Chapman. "There was a book that basically said, 'These are the things you need to know.' It was nice."

"But there's no curriculum for the advanced or master sommelier program," says Burgess. "They give you a list of recommended reading," and that's it.

"It's much more elusive," continues Chapman. He didn't pass the advanced exam on his first try. "I just didn't know what I was supposed to learn. Having gone through it, I got a sense." He passed on his second try. Now, he serves as the moderator of the group — which is not to say that he is merely a teacher, passing along information. "If you talk to any of the master sommeliers, they all have a group like this," says Burgess.

"You've got to create a community to make sense of wines," adds Chapman. "It's too expen-

sive to buy your own. And you learn about what other people know."

"I don't work with Italian wines, for example," says Redwine. "We studied them for three weeks. I'm just barely getting it, but it's great exposure when you're tasting with people who really know Italian wines."

Chapman says that even the masters "are always learning. Sometimes, someone will correct them, and they'll say, 'You're right.' Things are always changing. That's part of the reason they're always teaching, I think — it helps them keep track." (The group should know — they've

played host to a few of the masters. "Peter Neptune's come down twice" from Newport Beach, says Burgess.)

"Think of an athlete," offers Burgess. "You have to be constantly using your ability. So it's important to have a group that is pushing you. And if you know somebody's going to meet you at the gym, you're more inclined to go."

In some ways, the meeting is more like an academic test than a trip to the gym; you're expected to have studied beforehand. Everybody brings reading material: the latest edition of the *Oxford Companion to Wine*, a trade book on Spanish wines, a Xeroxed article on a tasting of Clos Ste. Hune Riesling. But the gym analogy is also apt. The group meets to taste and analyze wine; it is exercise, and you have to do it regularly. "It's a selective group," says Burgess. "Consistency of showing up is the most important thing. Restaurant hours are never short, but anybody who gets brought on has to have the same amount of dedication. If you're not here, if you're not following the format, you're sort of holding everybody up.

I was in a group before this one, and I got tired of being the only one who showed up."

After consistency, what matters is congeniality. "Everybody's supporting everybody else," says Chapman, "trying to make sure that everybody's learning. There are some people that are certainly plenty knowledgeable, but they might not be the best suited for this group."

"We don't feel nervous," agrees Burgess. "We say, 'What happens in this room stays in this room.'


Chapman elaborates. "It's a funny thing when you take a glass of wine that you don't know anything about. There's a vulnerability in sitting in front of people, when you're supposed to be an expert, and smelling and tasting and telling everybody what the wine is. Sometimes we're right, but a lot of times we're just totally wrong."

"If it was easy," notes Krikorian, "there would be more than 124 master sommeliers in the world."

Part of the master sommelier exam, says Chapman, involves analyzing six anonymous wines,









and you better be right about five of them if you're hoping to pass. "And Peter said that in the ten years he did it, they threw in every wine they could, trying to screw him up," says Henson. "They would throw in a Bierzot," says Chapman, referencing a relatively obscure region in Spain that produces Mencia, a wine that might get mistaken for the much more familiar Cabernet Franc. But the advanced isn't so brutal. There, he says, "The wines are true as true. They don't try to cheat you. They won't give you a wine from Jumilla, or Priorat" — up-and-coming Spanish regions. "If they give you a Spanish wine, it'll probably be a Rioja, and it'll be pretty straightforward. They taste the wines first, and there are certain things they want to make sure you're getting.'

'And you're never told if you got it right," says Burgess. There's a massive discussion afterwards. When I took my certified, there were just two wines, and when I walked out, I said what I thought they were, and half the people said, 'Oh, no, no, no, no.'

"The real goal is this," concludes Chapman. "You're standing at a table, and somebody asks you a question, and you know the answer. And you can answer in a way that's really articulate. The final goal, I think, is to be able to help make sense of these wines to people who don't speak the language we speak.'

"And the better you are, the less pretension will come across," agrees Krikorian. "You can get pretentious, and then, when you get really good, all the insecurity goes away." ■

A Little Moore Coffee Shop 1030 North Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-753-8228. How did this place slip by unnoticed for so long? Inside, with its low ceiling and snaky counter, it could be out of an Early California movie. The specials are named after recent local characters: "The Billy" is an omelet with ham, avocado, and cheese, plus home fries or hash browns (or cottage cheese or rice). "The Cindy" is two French toast with two eggs and spuds. A plate of grilled veggies and chicken or beef on a mountain of rice is "The Pablo." It's standard but generous fare, a formula that's kept the place humming since at least the 1950s. Breakfast and lunch, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/06)

Azafran 1001 South Coast Highway 101 (at West Street), Oceanside, 760-435-0005. This place just feels

Cuban, with its echoey inside, bongos, washed orange walls, and giant Cuban jazz mural. We're talking Caribbean-style food, not hot by Mexican standards. Most delicious intro: traditional Cuban pressed sandwiches, hot-pressed to mix the juices of, say, smoked ham, roast pork, cheese, mustard, pickles ("Cubano #2"), or roast pork (*lechón*) with a *mojo* (garlicky-citrus) sauce that makes it juicy. The bread, baked right here, is news in itself—crunchy and sometimes sweet (ask for *medianoche*). You get a lot, but don't leave without trying a plantain dish or the cheese flan. Or a cup of Cuban coffee. Lunch and dinner. Closed Monday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/04)

Beach House 2530 South Coast Highway 101 (at Lomas Santa Fe), Cardiffby-the-Sea, 760-753-1321. This beautiful restaurant, with its breezy seafront patio, is a branch of an upscale beach mini-chain (others are in Dana Point and Laguna Beach). Its main menu features steaks, seafood, and some "Continental" warhorses (lobster thermidor, etc.) that are best avoided. The view is even more spectacular from the upstairs "Top of the House" which features pub grub and fish in a lighthouse-like setting. On Sundays, local families flock in for the moderately priced à la carte champagne brunch featuring the standard dishes of the genre plus some less-successful fancied-up ones, with endless Freixenet champagne (Wyclef is its house champagne, though). Whatever the meal, stay simple here — burgers, steak, unfussy eggs — and enjoy the atmosphere. Reserve for a view table or

outdoor seating at Sunday brunch. Full bar but few wines. \$2 valet parking. Restrooms accessible by elevator, may be tight fit for wider wheelchairs. Daily brunch/lunch and dinner. "Top of the House" serves until 9:30 p.m. in winter and until 11 p.m. in summer. "Early bird" cut-price dinners daily. Brunch moderate, dinner moderate to very expensive. — N.W. (7/03)

Charlie's by the Sea 2565 South Coast Highway 101, Cardiff-by-the-Sea (a long block south of the stoplight), 760-942-1300. This seaside spot offers a blissful patio right on the breakwater and a terrific, authentic Boston-style clam chowder to match the view - it's light creamy, and loaded with clams, unpeeled red potato chunks, and bits of honey cured bacon. The kitchen's good with simple dishes, including fresh raw oys ters and the lively "Bayou Burger" with Caiun seasonings and well-made spicy fries. The dinner menu includes more ambitious items, but the weekly main event here is Sunday brunch, with a menu of standard brunch dishes at af fordable prices, featuring endless refills of champagne. (Hint: Veuve Clicquot it's not.) Huge wine list, full bar. Free valet parking. Brunch reservations advisable. Monday through Saturday, lunch and dinner; Sunday, brunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. – N.W. (9/03)

Kim's Restaurant 745 First Street, Lumberyard Shopping Center #103, Encinitas, 760-942-4816. Both Vietnamese and Chinese dishes are offered in a calm atmosphere with quick, pleasant service. The menu lists 265 items, including many Vietnamese house specialties, 28 seafood dishes, and a whopping 45 vegetarian/vegan dishes, many made with seitan (mock poultry). The seafood isn't necessarily fresh catch some shellfish is evidently obtained frozen, scallops are phosphate-preserved, and the reasonably priced abalone dishes involve slightly chewy, rehydrated dried abalone from Asia. On the other hand, portions are enormous, and the cooking is careful and tasty, although some flavors have evidently been adapted to American palates and ingredients. Open Tuesday through Sunday, continuous service lunch and dinner; closed Monday. Moderate. — N.W. (10/01)

Le Bambou Del Mar Village, 2634 Del Mar Heights Road (turn north on Mango), Del Mar Heights, 858-259-8138. No mere "pho joint," this lovely restaurant serves the sophisticated Vietnamese cuisine of pre-war Saigonand the owners' daughters serve it in the flower-bedecked dining room with grace, intelligence, and evident pleasure in teaching westerners about the cuisine. Appetizers (most of them designed for rolling with fresh herbs in lettuce leaves and eating with your hands) are varied and of superb quality. Few restaurants here do the royal delicacy of "ground shrimp on sugar cane" so well. Most of the house specialty entrées are equally accomplished. Lacqué duck, sautéed shrimps or scallops in tamarind sauce, and "Star of the Sea" curry are outstanding. The gently priced wine list abounds in the fruity whites that go so well with this cuisine, while beer-quaffers can enjoy Vietnam's own "33" brand. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Low moderate. — N.W. (6/05)

Meritage 897 South Coast Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Center, Encinitas, 760-634-3350. Chef-owner Susan Sbicca creates pristine California Cuisine here, highlighting fresh (and usually organic) local produce. A few pick hits are direct imports from her Sbicca down the coast — the irresistible

lobster-shrimp bisque is pure Del Mar deluxe. But some simpler dishes cleverly complete themselves as you eat them. It's a fun way to eat, engaging the mind along with the palate. The setting is family-friendly (only well-mannered kids come here) with a handsome, airy dining room and charming patio. Wideranging wine list, plenty by the glass and even some half-bottles. No corkage on Tuesday; Monday and Wednesday all bottles half price. Reservations advisable. Lunch and dinner daily, bar menu ongoing. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (7/03)

Nobu Japanese Restaurant 315 South Coast Highway 101 (near Dahlia Drive), Solana Beach, 858-755-7787. No, this isn't the famous fusion-food Nobu of NY, LA, and branches located wherever the money is. Our Nobu has been in the sushi business ten years longer than his namesake, and what he creates is classic non-fusion Japanese sushi and sashimi, with well-seasoned rice, freshly toasted seaweed wrappings, and fresh, fresh seafood. If you're in the mood for a different sort of grazing, you can settle at a table or booth to nibble on a score of appetizers, including a fine monkfish paté and enchanting chawan mushi (egg custard) soup served super hot in the cup it was baked in. The Japanese entrées are standard fare, with plenty for vegetarians. It's all comfortable, casual, and kid-friendly, with gracious sushi chefs. Nobu himself usually works the bar Wednesday through Sunday nights. Lunch and dinner daily, with a break between the meals; open weekends until 11 p.m. Large free lot behind restaurant (via Sierra Street, a block west). Mostly moderate; some delicacies expensive N.W. (5/05)

Oceanside Cafe 1938 South Coast Highway, Oceanside, 760-722-7337. This little place is as "mom and pop" as they get. "Hi honey. You going to have the usual?" That's Shannon. They do lunch, with good burgers, but breakfast's what a lot of folks come for. "Dieter's Downfall," a three-egg omelet stuffed with ham, bacon, sausage, tomato, Jack, and Cheddar, is wicked. Two other things to try: the "Sausage of the Week" is made next door at the Red and White Market (anything from bockwurst to French apple-chicken sausage). And the dieter's real downfall comes with their carrot cake or double chocolate cake — rich, moist, and fresh out of their owe every morning. Breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/03)

101 Cafe 631 South Coast Highway 101, Oceanside, 760-722-5220. This is the oldest li'l eating establishment in Oceanside. Cooks have been flipping burgers here since 1928. The café is named after Route 101, the Pacific Highway. Old-timers remember when everyone from truck drivers to movie stars would stop for a bite before heading on to San Diego and Tijuana. Try the ABC (avocado, bacon, and cheese) Omelet, the 101 Original Cheeseburger with its "secret sauce," chicken fried steaks with eggs and, of course, the Great Depression dish: biscuits with gravy and home fries. Open daily, three meals until midnight. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/01)

Samurai Japanese Restaurant Lomas Santa Fe Plaza, Garden Section, 979 Lomas Santa Fe Drive (one block east of I-5), Solana Beach, 858-481-0032. Set in a suburban mall, Samurai is rumored to have the longest sushi bar in California — 50 feet, stretching around 2 walls — with up to 12 chefs. The pure Japanese sushi is made from neverfrozen seafood, and the visual side of the art isn't neglected. The friendly chefs take care to make their compositions look as beautiful as they taste. There's also a spirit of "something extra" — e.g., not

just free edamame to nibble, but the ama ebi often includes a delicious miso soup made with extra shrimp heads. Additional dining choices include standard Japanese fare in the pretty dining room, kaiseki (prix fixe) dinners in the Tatami Room (for groups of four to fourteen, advance reservations required), or grilled items in the Teppan Room (two people minimum, reservations required). Open weekdays for lunch; dinner served nightly. For sushi, best to arrive early or lateish, as it gets crowded at prime time. Mostly moderate; kaiseki and some teppan items expensive. — N.W. (5/05)

Sbicca American Bistro 215 15th Street, Del Mar, 858-481-1001, Though characterized as an "American Bistro," Chef Susan Sbicca ("speeka") also reveals Asian and Mexican influences in her creative menu. Set in a one-time private home a block from the Del Mar coast, this lively restaurant boasts five dining rooms, including one downstairs with a fireplace and a "wine room" upstairs for private parties. In fair weather, the outdoor rooftop patio is the best seat in the house. The menu changes seasonally, though a few perennial favorites remain. The rich, deeply flavored lobster-shrimp bisque with overtones of sweet butter pastry is worth a return visit. A thick maple-roasted pork prime rib with vanilla-scented sweet potatoes and bourbon chantilly sauce is a house favorite, although not quite as exquisite as the soup. Monday nights feature \$4 martinis; on Tuesdays and Thursdays, all bottles of wine from the fine Californiacentric wine list are 50% off. No corkage fee on Wednesday. Crowded during racing season. Lunch and dinner daily. Expensive. — *B.D.* (5/05)

Swami's Cafe 1163 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-0612. No coincidence it's near the famous surf break and the Self-Realization Fellow-

ship compound. You gotta love the very Encinitas vegetarian-spiritual-surfer origins. You eat surrounded by gurgling fountains, wind chimes, wheat grass racks, a rainbow-colored wind sock, and the manager's 1969 surfer van. There are plenty of standard dishes, like eggs Benedict or black bean burrito, but the big emphasis is health. Try the protein veggie wrap, with avocado, feta cheese, tofu, and mole, or the Indian curry with tofu. Open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/04)

NORTH INLAND

Bernard'O Restaurant 12457 Rancho Bernardo Road, Rancho Bernardo Village Shopping Center, 858-487-7171. Ambiance excels here at one of the pretiest restaurants in the county. High ceilings, tall arched windows, rose-cream walls, fireplaces, and charming Gallic paintings make for an eyeful, and on many nights a harpist plays show tunes. The cuisine mingles French classics (for example, mussels with *frites*,) with daily specials offering seasonal Cal-Mediterranean cooking. These dishes seem a little less adventurous than in days of yore, but this is still a place for a gracious meal in a superb surrounding. Lunch Wednesday through Friday, dinner nightly. Expensive. — N.W. (6/04)

Cabana Cove Harrah's Rincon Casino, Valley Center, 877-777-2457. This fun eatery brings Pacific Beach to Valley Center with its cheerful (make that gorgeous) surfer decor and a menu of classy surfer grub. With glass walls looking out on the mountains and on two curvy swimming pools, this is the only restaurant in the casino to offer views of the outer world. The eclectic menu, from "surfing spots around the world," includes wonderful, smoky pork as both a taco and an entrée, plus pristine seafood choices. Full bar, creative cocktails. Breakfast Monday through Friday; lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. — N.W. (4/05)

The French Market Grille 15717 Bernardo Heights Parkway, San Diego, 858-485-8055. Ambience is served in generous portions at this romantic establishment with elegant indoor dining or a charming garden setting. The wine list has over 50 selections, including several available by the glass, and the varied menu offers Gallic dishes of duck, lamb, fish, veal, frog legs, and more. Most dishes are served with the usual French cuisine sauces, but if you're dieting, they'll gladly omit sauce. Ingredients and execution of the entrées can be inconsistent (e.g., some nights the fish is overcooked or the meat is tough, other nights they're fine) but the crab-cake appetizer is always outstanding. Save room for dessert, especially the excellent crème brûlée. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. — S.M. (11/03)

Hernandez' Hide-Away 19320 Lake Drive (off Del Dios Highway), Escondido, 760-746-1444. The founder of Hernandez' claims he invented the margarita at his previous restaurant in Bird Rock. True or not, the margaritas (rocks, not slush-ee) are terrific, on a par with Baja's best. The food, though, is detuned for gringos, with a standard menu of Cal-Mex specialties. Even the guacamole is under-seasoned, but if you like this sort of thing, a pleasant "enchilada pie" is as good as any Midwestern mom's. The huge bargain-priced brunch on Saturday and Sunday brings in the crowds; reservations urged for weekends to save a long wait. The exterior patio sports a big, funny mural, and the interior is carved into several rooms (helps keep the noise down) camped up with cute "Old West" cantina decor. Weekend

Jimbo — and there is a real Jimbo — started out selling healthy eating with the famous OB Co-op. Now he has these organic palaces of his own. Inside the Carmel Valley branch, it's high ceilings and lots of color — yellow, purple, white — with all the ducts and pipes exposed like in a giant submarine. The deli bulges with cheese, hams, burritos wraps, and an elaborate salad bar. At the juice counter they grind carrots and wheat grass and organic coffee. A "hot tabbouleh-type preparations. Best deals are usually the daily specials. Try Seitan stew (a high-protein, low-fat meat substitute) or Shelton's Jerk Turkey in Fig Sauce, served with organic mashed potatoes, gravy, and steamed vegetables. — *E.B.* (10/04)

Mille Fleurs 6009 Paseo Delicias, Rancho Santa Fe, 858-756-3085. One of the area's top destination restaurants Bertrand Hug's beautiful room with beautiful food draws "the beautiful people" — Hollywood honchos, high-end high school graduation parties, and a steady influx of rarefied Rancho Santa Fe residents flaunting huge twinkling rocks. The daily-changing menu sports first-rate modern French cuisine (with a few German touches) by long-time chef Martin Woesle. Order at will — everything's flawless. The menu's most exciting on weeknights, when crowds are sparser and the the kitchen has time to stretch. The wine list is fabulous but exorbitant even at the bottom. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Reservations recommended. Very, very expensive. — N.W. (5/01)

Onami Japanese Restaurant 240 East Via Rancho Parkway, North County Fair, Escondido, 760-738-7522. This Japanese buffet offers everything from miso soup and sukiyaki to a host of salads, including several variations of *sunomono* (cucumber salad). Then there are terivakis, sashimis, and a plethora of sushi rolls. Among the winners are the California roll with masago, tempura shrimp roll, guacamole roll, and Philadelphia roll. Skip the dry egg rolls and head for the corn crab cakes, teriyaki chicken, tempura shrimp, and veggies. Desserts offer fresh fruits, bite-size cake options, and go-back-for-seconds green tea ice cream. The food is fresh, the pre-sentation artful, and the staff friendly and efficient. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Expensive. — S.M. (8/04)

Wine Sellar and Brasserie 9550 Waples Street #115, Mira Mesa, 858-450-9557. The French-continental food is a delight to the palate. Lunch on Saturday served by itself or in conjunc tion with the wine tasting. Call for directions and specific hours. - E.W.

LA JOLLA

Cafe Japengo The Aventine, 8960 University Center Lane, La Jolla, 858-450-3355. Here Bentleys and Beamers far outnumber Buicks. Inside is contemporary with an Asian flair, complete with kimono stands and bamboo forests. Sushi is the specialty, and it's above av-

erage, although the sushi bar chefs aren't very friendly, and the seasoned rice tastes quite salty. The highly prized fatty tuna (toro) and flying fish roe tobiko are offered when available. Otherwise, they may be replaced by smelt roe, *masago*, which may be a minor disappointment. However, the *uni* (sea urchin roe) is pristine. If you appreciate subtlety, try the egg-omelet sushi (tamago), a delightful mixture of eggs, sake, and mirin. Creative party rolls are especially popular here, including the amusing Tootsie Roll — sweet and spicy, crunchy and spongy, with fried soft shell crab topped with grilled shitake mushrooms, avocado, and a sake marinade. Entrées are often a letdown, but diners may be satisfied to make a meal from appetizers like the Char Su Duck Salad with goat cheese, candied pecans, and pomegranate vinaigrette; Duck Wontons with coriander pesto and *ponzu* sauce; and an excellent kimchi martini. No reservations for the sushi bar; arrive No reservations for the susmi bar; arrive early for prompt seating. Lunch week-days only; sushi bar opens at 5 p.m.; dinner begins at 6 p.m. Very expensive. — B.D. (10/05)

Cliff Hanger Cafe Torrey Pines Gliderport, 2800 Torrey Pines Scenic Drive, La Jolla, 858-452-9858. "You should never leave the ground on an empty stomach," says the sign near the cliff, which is where this café hangs. What is it like to be at the Café at the End of the World? You sit, munch, and watch men becoming birdmen, jumping off the cliff beside you. The view of the Pacific Ocean is spectacular. But, hey, grub's good too. Try the Launch (a breakfast burrito with scrambled eggs, bacon, cheese, onions, bell peppers, and salsa) or the Mile High omelet (bacon, cheese, and bell peppers). Also great and grilled right there: generous half-pound hamburgers. Open daily

for breakfast and lunch. In expensive. —

Roy's 8670 Genesee Avenue, Costa Verde Center (across from UTC), La Iolla, 858-455-1616. Our own noisy outpost of top Hawaii chef Roy Yamaguchi's both "top chef" and "chain" about it. Decoding Roy's Rules of Ordering can make the difference between a mediocre dinner and a very happy meal: 1. Steer clear of combination platters — the same dishes come off much better when ordered separately; 2. You can get any element of a combo by asking for it; 3. Don't waste your palate (or money) on weak umbrella drinks when the wine list is brilliant. The menu changes daily, but some frequent tasty choices are pot stickers, lumpia "Kahana," or chocolate soufflé. Special dietary requests accommodated, including vegetarian meals. Reserve, and hope for a table far from the raucous bar. Open nightly. Very expensive. — N.W. (4/01)

Sky Room Top floor of La Valencia Hotel, 1132 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-0771. (Closed for renovations, set to reopen December.) The stunning ocean view offers three essentials for a memorable evening: privacy, intimacy, and the ability to talk without the interruption of noise. The food is a feast to the eyes as well as the palate. Best bets: abalone and scallop steak appetizer, the daily soup, diver scallops, and lobster. Dinner only, with two seatings on weekends. Emerald Chinese Seafood

3709 Convoy Street (at Aero Drive), 1st floor, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888. Arguably the best Chinese restaurant in the county, here's where local Asians (of all nations) go for both casual family din-ners and special feasts of Hong Kong specialties. When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Vietnamese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gourmet delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations accepted for all meals, including weekend dim sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in made-to-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate with moderate splurges like live fish and Peking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). Open daily from lunch until midnight or later.

Korea House 4620 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-0080. Korea House offers floor seating or a table if you want to barbecue your own food. . The menu offers fine "down-home" Korean food, such as traditional mandoo (beef) dumplings, gaejang backban, or raw crab, and yookhwe, a steak tartare worth risking. Make a meal from enormous appetizers like *gul bosam* (raw oysters, pork, and cabbage leaves). Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — M N (9/98)

Nijiya Market 3860 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-3821. If you're not willing to sacrifice quality for convenience when eating fast food, try this Japanese market in Kearny Mesa. Nijiya Market offers prepared box lunches, or bento, that are pretty to look at, appetizing, and a real bargain. I suggest, how-ever, passing by Nijiya's steam trays and heat lamps and going straight to the coolers, where you'll find delicious chicken cutlets, fresh sushi, and chilled noodles. as well as dessert delicacies like sweet bread roll filled with sweet bean paste. Inexpensive. — M.N. (8/99)

Pampas Argentine Grill 8690 Aero Drive (at Montgomery Field), Kearny Mesa, 858-278-5971. The Argentine spe-cialties feature grilled grass-fed beef, including a somewhat Americanized version of the gauchos' great parillada mixta (mixed grill), with a great chorizo but minus any exotic organs. The naturally raised meats are lower fat and lower cholesterol than feed-lot beef but are salted heavily in the kitchen unless you request otherwise. Specify rare or medium-rare, unless you really like brown cardboard. Lighter fare includes free-range chicken and fresh, welltreated seafood. Beef empanadas are a tasty, authentic starter. Potatoes (fries and mashed) are splendid, salads are exuberant. The full bar features Chilean and Argentine beverages with many af-fordable South American wines by the glass. Park in lot at restaurant's front door, not the back-door lot. Lunch (mainly sandwiches) on weekdays. Dinner nightly. Entertainment (harp) Friday through Sunday. Closed Monday. Moderate. — N.W. 

A good-value combo is the Southern-Style sandwich — beef, pork, ham, or chicken with coleslaw inside, along with a sauce that's just right: sweet, tangy, spicy. Most original idea? A BBQ burrito with meat, baked beans, coleslaw, and sauce wrapped in a flour tortilla. Expanded menu includes gyros. But Kono's is known among locals, too, for generous breakfasts. Check out their PBS: Pancakes, Bacon and Scrambled eggs. Or the breakfast sandwich with eggs, bacon, cheese, and tomato on a toasted English muffin. Or the CB Burger (chicken breast, green chili, and pica sauce). Best time: foggy mornings. Chow down on their patio on the pier while you enjoy a birds-eye view of surfers appearing out of the mists below. Breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/00)

Mardi Gras Cafe 3185 Midway Drive (near Rosecrans and East Street, in minimall with a 7-11, across the street from Godfather Pizza), Loma Portal, 619-223-5501. The Creole cooking at this café/grocery, to eat in, take out, or have catered for your next party, is sound and tasty, if deliberately underseasoned (just add salt and hot sauce to taste). You can also buy the real and rare ingredients from the freezer, deli case, and grocery shelves, including Cajun tasso (spiced ham), boudin blanc (rice sausage) and crawfish sausage. Daily brunch through early dinner. No alcohol, everything available for takeout. Inexpensive. -N.W. (2/01)

MZM Seacoast Bistro 875 Seacoas Drive, Imperial Beach, 619-424-5800. If you can make it past the bland exterior, you'll discover a well-disguised classy oint inside. A harbinger of a new I.B.? Interior is all peach-colored walls, trendy blue sconce wall lights, tweedy booths, and photos of owners Marek and Zofia Migdalski with people like President Bush, Lloyd Bentsen, Sam Donaldson, and Joan Kroc. Migdalski is a recognized private chef who has decided to put I.B. on the gastronomic map. Breakfast, available Saturday and Sunday, tends to be simple but sophisticated, like frittata with Polish sausage, prime rib steak and eggs, or scrambled eggs with smoked salmon. Burgers at lunch are often lamb sirloin. Dinner can be anything, including filet mignon or flatiron steak. Reservations recommended. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (6/04)

Sapporo Japanese Restaurant 5049 Newport Avenue (by the pier), Ocean Beach, 619-222-6686. It's small, but Sapporo has big deals, particularly the lunch specials that usually give you a miso soup, salad, and a combo such as

chicken teriyaki and California rolls and white rice — all presented like a piece of performance art. Other specials include yaki soba (stir-fried sautéed chicken, vegetables, and noodles) and champon noodle soup (udon noodles, scallops, shrimp, vegetables), and the value-packed Chicken Bowl — a big plate of sliced chicken, broccoli, other vegetables, and a swag of rice. Dinner daily, lunch daily except Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/01)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

Antique Row Cafe 3002 Adams Avenue (at 30th Street), Normal Heights, 619-282-9750. (Also in Lemon Grove.) Antique-land's favorite eatery is a serious exhibit in its own right, especially if you're into sports memorabilia. Look for signed photos of Mickey Mantle, Ted Williams, and Joe DiMaggio (all googlyeyed with Marilyn) on the walls. The word for the food: generous. All-day breakfast dishes include "The Works" omelet, stuffed with bacon, sausage, ham, bell peppers, onions, tomatoes, and cheese bulging over a big oval plate along with skins-on breakfast potatoes. "Philly Steak Heaven" (you choose: steak, ham, or turkey) is one of the more popular lunchtime dishes. Open daily, 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

Asia Cafe 4710 Market Street (at 47th Street), Chollas View, 619-527-1917. May be Asian San Diego's best-kept secret. You have to look behind the smog shop at this all-Laotian shopping center to find it. The menu's Southeast Asian, but the owner — and most of the conversation around you — is Lao. Lao dishes include the famous larb-kai (chicken salad with hot peppers, lemon grass, and sticky rice). Good regional alternatives: banee (egg noodle) roasted pork soup, Crying Tiger (ground beef salad with vegetables), and lard nar (seafood, beef, or pork with sloppy wide noodles and vegetables). Closed Tuesday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

Magnolias Market Creek Square, 342 Euclid (off Market), Lincoln Park, 619-262-6005. If you're looking for an authentic Louisiana-style feast, this is the best place in town. Bessie Johnson (of the once-famed Bessie's Garret) is back in business, and mouths are rejoicing. At her handsome, spacious restaurant, you'll find generous hospitality, huge portions, and a long, delicious menu of Cajun, Creole, and soul food specialties. The fried chicken is beyond compare, the jambalaya well-nigh perfect, and the

BBQ shrimp, crawfish bisque, and étouffée are splendid. Great side dishes include candied sweet potatoes and cornbread dressing. No takeout (except leftovers). Full bar. Lunch and dinner six days; closed Mondays. Low moderate. — N.W. (2/05)

Mama's Bakery and Lebanese Deli 4237 Alabama Street, North Park, 619-688-0717. You'll remember this lovely little place for two reasons. One, the atmosphere: It's a tiny kitchen at tached to an old red-and-green wooden house, with tables and green umbrellas on the sloping sidewalk and also inside a shelter of bougainvillea, green canvas, metal mesh, and white brick, Two, their sajj. It's a round Lebanese oven of ancient design which cooks the delicious flat bread (also called sajj) that goes with pretty much everything, including baba ghanoush ("sweet daddy" eggplant dip) and *fool madamas* (fava and garbanzo bean stew). Gotta-haves include beef shawerma wrap or falafel wrap and a meat pie unlike any you've had before. A lovely bonus: fresh Lebanese baklava and a little pot of thick, sweet, black Arabic coffee. Open 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday to Friday, weekends until 4 p.m. In-expensive. — *E.B.* (12/05)

Pizzeria Luigi 1137 25th Steet (at C Street), Golden Hill, 619-233-3309. They claim to make real New York pizza in this tiny storefront and they're not lying. One of the owners is from Brooklyn and his origins are written all over the pies. The sauce tastes right and the crusts are thin enough that you can fold a slice into a "V" to eat on the run, New Yorker style. But it's better to take home a whole pie with your choice of toppings (or a stromboli or calzone) and enjoy it at leisure. Inexpensive. — N.W. (7/04)

Sang Dao 4212 National Avenue, Logan Heights, 619-263-0914. Laos has an exotic Shangri-La thing about it, yet the large family that runs this eatery will tell you Lao food is quite plain and simple: vegetables, freshwater fish, chicken, pork, occasional beef, sticky rice, and noodles. But taste their delicious spicy catfish and you're right back at exotic. Thai basil, garlic, and most of all, the gingery galanga, a.k.a. "Laos root," help make it unfishy. Other must-trys: BBQ beef, som yum (papaya salad), and especially the spicy salad with minced meat called larb—closest thing to the national dish. The surroundings here may be homey, but not the excellent cuisine. "Sang Dao"? It means "Star Light." Lunch and dinner six days; closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/04)

Tioli's Crazy Burger 4201 30th Street (at Howard, across from Vons), North Park, 619-282-6044. Cheap eats can be

great eats when made by people who care — like charming owner "Wolfie" and European-trained chef Lothar. The place looks like a dive, but inside you'll find creative, made-to-order burgers from beef to buffalo, gator, and ostrich (delicious!), and even fish and veggies — each with its own individualized seasonings and sauce, plus salads and flavorful German-style bratwursts. Even the turkey burger is juicy here. Try the house-made "Texas" beans and the house-made mustard and chipotle ketchup. Specialty and regular beers; affordable wines. Parking lot behind restaurant on Howard. Restroom is not wheelchair accessible. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (5/06)

Uncle Joe's Pizzeria 4591 El Cajon Boulevard, Talmadge, 619-584-2535. The owner's a retired Navy medic, one of the first women to serve in the Middle East combat zone. She's named sand-wiches for career stops, like "The Recruit Training Center, Orlando, Florida" (chicken breast, bacon, avocado, provolone cheese, spinach, tomato, and onion) or "North Island Dental Clinic" (turkey, ham, bacon). But try a main dish like eggplant Parmesan or chicken with sautéed mushrooms. Or a massive chunk of lasagna, plus bread and salad. Coffee? You get a huge French-style press-the-coffee-down affair. Your big decision: eat out on the flower-strewn boulevard patio or inside among black leather easy-chairs and a giant screen? Open for lunch and dinner daily, until 2 a.m. Thursday through Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (6/06)

Vagabond Kitchen 2310 30th Street (Fern at Juniper), South Park, 619-255-4373 or 619-255-1035. Seasonal "world food" filtered through a Gallic sensibility, plus worldwide wines and tropical cocktails. Menu changes often, but don't miss the classic moules-frites or the deep-flavored Peruvian seco de carne meat stew. The tiny, painfully noisy dining room, decorated with exotic souvenirs of the owners' global travels, is perpetually SRO, so dinner reservations are a must for any night. Evening crowd of hip South Park locals, lunch crowd dressed for success. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. — N.W. (7/06)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Brothers Family Restaurant 5150 Waring Road (at Orcutt Avenue), Allied Gardens, 619-287-0880. Yes, it looks boring on the outside. Brick, reflective glass. But go in and you're surrounded by brothers: John and Bobby Kennedy, Hugh Grant and his brother Jamie, the Wright Brothers, the Blues Brothers, the Brothers Rico. They're there because this place used to be run by three brothers. Good old-fashioned cholesterol city rules here with no apologies, and the locals appreciate it. It's like a *Cheers* for eating. All the staples are served: country-fried steak and eggs, pork chops with eggs, Grandma Jennie's pancakes with ham, bacon, and sausage — even hefty beef or tuna or turkey sandwiches with soup. Open seven days for breakfast and lunch, with early dinner Wednesday to Friday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/04)

Charley's Famous Hamburgers and Kebobs 8312 Broadway (at Sweetwater Road), Lemon Grove, 619-460-2690. When you spot an old red-and-white gas station that looks like a café, don't hesitate. That's Charley's. The palm and ficus trees have replaced the gas pumps and a fountain now gurgles where the air hoses used to be. The menu is a long list of hamburgers, as well as hot dogs, sandwiches, and kebobs. Mostly take-out, but you can dine out at their picnic tables under bougainvillea. Open daily, three meals. — E.B. (12/01)

Couleur Cafe 7820 Broadway, Lemon Grove, 619-697-0036. Couleur has gone "raw." The Living Room-comfy café, with couches and classy swirly cane chairs, always had interesting big sandwiches, but now raw is the rage. Walnut burgers, "seafood" cucumber salads, hazelnut-and-raisin breakfast cereal with bananas, macadamia, and Brazil nut milk — all are part of the new diet of live-enzyme food. If you're not ready, four traditional sandwiches are still there (BLT, tuna, salmon, and chicken). Open 12 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday (to 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday). Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/04)

D.Z. Akin's 6930 Alvarado Road, Alvarado Plaza, College Area, 619-265-0218. Surely the best Jewish delicatessen in San Diego. Soups are wonderful, and so are the 110 sandwiches, especially the corned beef. The *knishes* and chopped liver easily rival Mother's. Excellent breakfasts and outstanding, fully stocked bakery. Open daily, breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.W.*

Fix Me a Plate Cafe 9168 Fletcher Parkway (next to Souplantation), La Mesa, 619-466-6084. Chef-owner Jimmy Pomier was executive chef at the great Juke Joint Cafe, and now he's got his own place to serve up whopping portions of authentic Cajun and Louisiana-style soul food. His oyster po' boy is (as France's Michelin Guide might say) "worth a detour," as good as it gets this far away. His gumbo is eccentric; his deep-fried chicken gizzards with aioli are fun. His delicious étouffés are among the highlights of the long menu (on which not all dishes are available all the time). Skimpy wine and beer selection, and BYOB is strictly forbidden, but the lemonade is okay. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday (with break between on weekends). Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (2/06)

4.0 Deli Aztec Shopping Center, 5844 Montezuma Road, 619-281-4040. This low-ceilinged, dark, student sandwich hangout gets the frat house crowd, luring them in with draft beers and big Buds that go for a song. Pitchers too, if you buy sandwiches with them, and the sandwiches are no dull lunch-counter fare. Try the Montezuma, a toasted sub with grilled chicken cutlets, chorizo, Monterey Jack, and a "kick-butt southwestern dressing." Or Grilled Rivas, named after a much-loved Colombian who worked here: grilled turkey, Monterey Jack, grilled onions, and peppers. Check specials like the Buffalo Bleu, with grilled roast beef, bacon, red onions, bleu cheese, and Tabasco. The owners had a full-scale deli in New York, so this range is no surprise. Open daily, 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/04)

Grossmont Student Center Cafeteria Grossmont College, 8800 Grossmont College Drive, El Cajon, 619-644-7000. This is no UCSD, with its dozen food franchises and Persian and Somali food tents on campus. Grossmont's single cafeteria (open to the pub-lic) is big, echoey, and sticks to standardissue food like crumb-coated chicken katsu, cheeseburgers, burritos, and really, really cheap pizzas. Breakfast? How about a sausage and tater tot burrito? Health fans do have a plentiful salad bar. It's quite an experience, sharing lunch with local and foreign students, looking over the rolling hills to El Cajon — lik being at an international finishing school in, well, Switzerland. Open 7 7 p.m., Monday to Thursday; till 2 p.m. Friday. Closed weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B. (6/06)

Jasmine Bistro Westfield Plaza, 315 Parkway Plaza (at Fletcher and the 67 Freeway), El Cajon, 619-588-8228. A gleaming little architectural jewel surrounded by the big white boxes of its mall, Jasmine Bistro is a spin-off of the well-known Jasmine Hong Kong Seafood Restaurant on Convoy. By day, the fare centers on fresh, expertly made Chinese dim sum (elaborate fingerfood) offered both by cart and by menu. At night, with a reservation, a fresh crew of multiethnic chefs step in to cook up a Pan-Asian panoply, so if you're in the

(Drive through the parking lots until you reach the fenced swimming pool; the restaurant's small, dimly marked door is just to the left.) The California Cuisine menu offers elaborate seafood appetizers (out here in the desert) and entrées with fine, subtle sauces, fresh veggies from nearer the coast, and rather mild-flavored, exquisitely tender meats, evidently cho-

sen to be gentle to the dentures of the duffers. Desserts are few and very sweet. Full bar; great (but pricey) wine list. Reserve for weekend evenings. Open daily. Very expensive. — N.W. (4/03)

The Olde Homestead Fudge Factory The Center, 590 Palm Canyon Drive (north side of the street), Borrego Springs, 760-767-7782. 

A simple neighborhood sushi bar offering imaginative rolls, each one so distinctively seasoned that there's no need to mar the pretty fish-scapes with wasabi dip. The fish is super-fresh and includes salmon that Kazumi-san cold-smokes himself. For a family-style dinner, "The Ultimate Boat" (serving two or more) is an encyclopedia of Japanese specialties, a huge platter of sushi, gyoza, assorted appetizers, yakitori, terivaki, and terrific tempura, Need comfort food? The tempura also graces the top of a satisfying bowl of nabeyaki udon (noodle soup) with an onion-sweet broth. With just a small staff of family members in the kitchen and house, ex pect a wait for food at busy times. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (10/00)

Kung Food Express Cafe 2949 Fifth Avenue (at Quince), uptown, 619-298-7302. These guys really try to be green. They have a "100-percent plant-based menu," use solar-heated water, give their food waste to farmers to compost, and even try to use biodegradable cutlery, plates, and bowls. They have a "live" food section (meaning raw, so enzymes survive), plus vegan and vege-tarian items. One great-looking lunch offering is the collard wrap, a big green collard leaf wrapped around a mix of cashews, agave, agave nectar, alfalfa, cilantro, mango, red cabbage, and avocado. Also good are the dishes using steamed quinoa — the Incas' mother grain — plus curried veggies, and beans with Soyrizo. Nice courtyard with native grasses, climbing vines, white umbrellas. Open 11 a.m. till 11 p.m., daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (6/06)

The Mission 2801 University Avenue North Park, 619-220-8992 (also in Mission Beach and East Village). "Urban assault food for a revolutionary people. say the wait staff's black T-shirts. But the food here is less revolutionary than halfway between health-nut and greasy spoon. Still, their "conscientious cuisine" is generous, good-looking, and intelli-gent, if a little middle-class timid. Breakfasts are big here. The delicious chickenapple sausage and eggs comes on a foot-wide plate loaded with unskinned rosemary potatoes, scrambled eggs, and scrumptious baked-on-the-spot rose-mary bread. Pancakes and French cinnamon toast are popular staples, as is the Zen Breakfast (scrambled egg whites, braised tofu, brown rice, with veggies). The roast beef hash can be chewy. Check

out the "Chino-Latino" dishes (lunch house feel. Open daily, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (4/05)

Ortega's, A Mexican Bistro 141 University Avenue (at Third Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-692-4200. Owned by a member of the Ortega family, the Puerto Nuevo lobster pioneers, this is the Baja restaurant group's first north-of-the border venture. You'll find Baja-style cuisine featuring seafood and grilled foods, with a focus on local spiny lobster. Unlike the typical Ortega's, the lobster is n't deep-fried before grilling - an improvement in tenderness and flavor. Of course, the crustacean's best in season (October to February). Fish ceviche makes a good starter course. Other choices include small tacos, steaks, kebabs, etc., plus the standard Puerto Nuevo side dishes — stewed (not re-fried) beans, and an oddly bland guacamole fixed tableside. Full bar; fun margaritas including almond and pomegranate variations. Reservations recommended for weekends. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Mainly moderate (lobsters and Kobe skirt steak expensive). — N.W. (8/05)

Phil's BBQ 4030 Goldfinch Street, Mission Hills, 619-688-0559. Check the lines around Phil's any lunchtime. 

It emphasizes grilled-to-order marinated meats (especially lamb), stews, and well-seasoned rice dishes, and uniquely delicious appetizers such as leek ravioli (aushak), leek or meat turnovers (bulanee), and battered vegetables (pakawra). The grilled salmon is excellent, and don't miss the side dish of sweet pumpkin topped with yogurt and meat sauce (kadu). Plenty for vegetarians, too. Interesting, affordable wine list; Mexican and domestic beers. Small patio. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Moderate. — NW (8/05)

City Pizzeria 1125 Sixth Avenue (between B and C), downtown, 619-531-0955. There's a cultural war going on here. "City" has a New York attitude — just listen to the guys in the kitchen grabbing dough, flailing it around, yakking, joking. But the dough

has been a West Coast family's secret for 75 years. Try the "Ranch Chicken" pie with garlic chicken, basil, and ranch dressing, or the BBQ chicken with pineapple, red onion, BBQ sauce, and mozzarella. (Of course, no self-respecting New York pizzeria would ever consider serving such moonbeamish left coast toppings — not even if they were in New Jersey.) If those don't tempt you, there are eleven other "specialty pies" every day. Open daily till 10 p.m., 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/04)

Croce's Restaurant and Jazz Bar 802 Fifth Avenue, downtown, 619-233-4355. "Live music is complimentary with purchase of a dinner en-trée" at this restaurant and bar run by Ingrid Croce in honor of her late husband, Jim. Appetizers that mix flavors — like the baked Brie and honey-roasted garlic served with mixed greens and a Grand Marnier berry compote — are delicious. But despite creative dishes, like New Zealand sea bass with a pomegranatemacadamia crust, few entrées rise above the level of average Gaslamp fare. Simple is best here — the rich and creamy shrimp carbonara fettuccine with Italian pancetta, Kalamata olives, and basil in a white garlic cream sauce. For dessert, try the flourless chocolate cake with roasted walnuts and pecans served with Tahitian vanilla bean gelato and Verona chocolate sauce. The menu is seasonal. Sit by the window for great people-watching or retire to the bar if you prefer live jazz. Open nightly for dining and music (breakfast and lunch Saturday and Sunday). Expensive. — BD (10/05)

Crudo Restaurant 1953 India Street (at Grape), Little Italy, 619-398-2974. Crudo refers to the Italian version of sushi, but that's not on the menu at this flashy eatery-cum-nightclub, a partnership between Italian restaurateur Joe Busalacchi and disco maven Mike Viscuso. Nope, the raw fish here is Japanese-fusion sushi and sashimi, with some excellent, creative "party rolls" (like the Green Hornet and the Crudo roll) and a delightful, shareable sashimi "plateau" — a mini-ency-

clopedia of fish and garnishes. Fusiony appetizers, noodle or rice bowls, and baroque, high-end entrées fill out the list. Having a bite before the disco opens buys free entry to the lounge. Short wine list at high markups; numerous sakes (mainly by-the-bottle only) at high-to-ridiculous markups; full bar. Want quiet? The dining patio in front is sheltered and serene. Disco Wednesday through Saturday night. Dinner nightly. "Bowls" and simple sushi inexpensive, otherwise very expensive. — N.W. (4/06)

LG's Prime Steakhouse 789 Sixth Avenue (at F Street), downtown, 619-239-7899. The atmosphere at this chain steakhouse is a little less "old bovs' club" than most of its kind - it's quiet and luxurious, but not especially formal. All the beef is aged on the premises, and the star cut is the superb dry-aged "Jewel in the Crown" Porterhouse, with much beefier flavor than wet-aged meat. Meats are heavily salted unless you request otherwise; sauces taste a little pre-fab. The Caesar salad is made at the table to your tastes. "Escargots alfredo" is fun as an indulgent starter. Everything's à la carte, with good creamed spinach among the sides. Great, if pricey, wine list, but the top reds are barely over retail prices. Full bar. Valet parking at Fifth and F. Reservations recommended. Open for dinner 365 days a year. Very expensive. — N.W. (8/05)

McCormick & Schmick's Omni Hotel, 675 L Street (at Sixth Avenue), downtown, 619-645-6545. This ever-expanding chain from the Pacific Northwest may be the Starbucks of fish. Most of the dishes are still the corporate specialties, pleasing rather than exciting. The daily changing menu features about 30 varieties of fresh seafood, delivered daily in over 50 preparations, plus a handful of poultry and meat dishes. The long, interesting, mainly reasonable wine list is printed on back of the daily menu. Restaurant is often busy at lunch and packed for early dinners during Petco home-game nights, so reserve when the team's in town. A heated terrace is mainly used during lunch and game

nights. Full bar. Open daily, three meals to 11 p.m. Lunch moderate; dinner moderate to expensive — *N.W.* (10/05)

Patty's Fruitland 1789 National Avenue (at Beardsley), Barrio Logan, 619-239-3085. Patty used to sell fresh fruit drinks outside a church in Guanajuato. In 1994 she came to America and married Jose. "Why can't we sell fruit drinks in America?" she wondered. Now they've opened a place where you can get combos like the pico de gallo (rooster's beak) with lots of fresh-sliced fruit and raw veggies (jicama, cucumber), all dusted with cayenne pepper. They've expanded to non-fruit (roast beef and other sandwiches, shrimp tostadas, hot dogs), but the fruit and juices define the place. The most tempting: fruit salad with cottage cheese, granola, and honey. Monday to Friday 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Saturday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/04)

Pokez Mexican Restaurant and Vegetarian Cuisine 947 E Street (at Tenth Avenue), downtown, 619-702-7160. Rafael — his buddies call him Rafa — started this cool student/artist hangout years ago when he was 18. Lunchtime business people come here. Evenings, seems like it's all Rafa's friends: people from downtown, Golden Hill, City College. The food is mostly Mexican vegetarian (though he's got meaty things like chicken or steak ranchero or sautéed chicken fajitas). Tip well: the servers volunteer and share the take from the gravy pot. Monday to Friday 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.; weekends 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.—E.B. (12/01)

RA Sushi 474 Broadway (at Fifth), downtown, 619-321-0021. Big and splashy, this Arizona-based chain restaurant tries to create a high-energy party atmosphere with loudish music and louder "Oriental" decor. Its grazing menu features sushi, sashimi, and hosts of Asian-oid appetizers, plus a few substantial noodle dishes and entrées. The food's a mixture of the dire and the delicious—old, pulpy edamame versus magnificent miso soup, delicate dilled salmon and desiccated katsu. The sushi rice is well sea-

soned, but the products are inconsistent from hour to hour and roll to roll, depending on how long ago the seafood was defrosted and how recently the rice was cooked. You take your chances, but it's fun anyway. Numerous Asian beers and sakes, affordable wines, full bar specializing in fancy cocktails. Those with fading eyesight may need a penlight to read the menu. Daily, lunch through dinner, to 11 p.m. Bar open to 2 a.m. Moderate. — N.W. (504)

Vincenzo Ristorante Italiano 1702 India Street, Little Italy, 619-702-6181. The specialty at this tourist favorite is Scilian seafood. The cooking is competent, but the restaurant's fishmonger settles for ordinary quality (as does the produce provider). The meat jobber does a better job, providing succulent lamb and veal that the chef grills expertly, and the Italian sausages (from Pete's Meats, up the block) are the zestiest in town. The restaurant's hard-surfaced interior is so noisy you'll hear every conversation but your own; reserve for the sidewalk patio for a quieter evening. Open lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Moderate. — N.W. (8/01)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

The Barbecue Pit 920 East Plaza Boulevard, National City, 619-477-2244. Outside, it reminds you of a barn; inside, a meeting hall. Rustic timber, knotty pine, a set of Texas longhorns on one wall and an eight-point buck head on the other. People have been coming here all their lives. Two cousins started this back in 1947 at 1413 Market, downtown. Now their grandkids run this and its sister restaurant in Fletcher Hills. They still burn oak, and sell lots of the (still-cheap) beef or pork ribs, with two sides and a bun. But maybe the best deal is the ham or link sandwich. Lunch and dinner; closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/06)

Bino's European Coffees and Crepes 1120 Adella Avenue (just off Orange Avenue), Coronado, 619-522-0612. This little round-the-corner café (south of the Post Office) has to be good: it's a favorite retreat for local chefs. Bino bakes his own breads and croissants daily and creates great crunchy sandwiches. Try the Brie Fantasy (chicken breast, roasted marinated peppers, double cream Brie cheese) or the roast beef and jack cheese. Even the veggie sandwich squishes with luscious egg plant, and the crêpes are delicious and filling too. Bino's wife is Austrian and makes great Viennese-style coffee. Open 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, to 8 p.m. Thursday through Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Galley at the Marina 550 Marina Parkway, Chula Vista, 619-422-5714. This is a great place to relax, take in the view, and decide which vacht you're gonna buy when you win the lotto. It's run by Fran Muncey, widow of Bill Muncey, San Diego's greatest speedboatracing champion. The tasty, bargainpriced happy hour specials (3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday) make a visit worth the trip west of I-5: have a 1/2-pound hamburger with French fries, chicken Caesar salad with sourdough toast, or a filet mignon steak plate with steak fries. Next morning, catch the breakfast favorite: biscuits and sausage gravy with eggs. Inexpensive. E.B. (11/00)

Merkl's Deli-BBQ 415 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-0767. Named after Sebastian Merkl, the owner's German granddad, who jumped ship in New York after World War I. Merkl's claims to be the "first real New York-style deli south of Hillcrest." It certainly has serious, all-day, New York-type breakfasts like pastrami and corned beef three-egg omelets or Reuben omelets filled with corned beef, Swiss cheese, and sauerkraut. Or salami and eggs, pancakestyle There's even a breakfast Philly cheese steak. But it's not only New York. Out back, their Texas-style smoker burns mesquite for some pretty mean ribs. Also check Chula Vista's truck farm history on the walls, a collection of crate-end la bels with all the fruits that this town's soils used to produce. Open every day breakfast through dinner; Sundays breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/04)

Point-Point Joint 916 East Eighth Street, National City, 619-474-2866. You're in Little Manila here, heartland of San Diego's Filipino community. So the food has to be authentic. Your problem's going to be choosing. Dozens of dishes with mysterious meats and veggies. You can play safe and choose, say, chicken barbecue on a bamboo spit, chicken barbecue on a bamboo spit, chicken adobo, or longaniza sausage. But you should seek out less familiar choices, too. Kare-kare (yam, peanut butter sauce with beef and tripe) is delicious, and so is dinuguan, pork in pork blood, also known as "chocolate meat." Want healthy? There's monggo (mung beans)

with bitter melon leaves, or point to a pile of split, deep-fried fish — daing na bangus, vinegar-soaked milk fish, said to be popular with old men with high blood pressure. Lunch, dinner seven days; breakfast Friday, Saturday, Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/03)

Primavera Ristorante 932 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0454, A handsome dining room is the setting for classic fine Italian cooking of many regions, and with creative nightly specials. Stuffed pastas are made in-house and rolled thin, gnocchi are expertly crafted, and entrées are, for a change, more interesting than the appetizers. The osso buco is outstanding, as is a frequent summertime special of white king salmon. Choose the simplest desserts, as the fancy ones are outsourced (and heavy). Three parking slots behind restaurant, or scuffle for street parking. Fine service. Romantic ambiance early and late in the evening but often raucous with loud parties at prime dinner time. Dinner nightly until 11 p.m. Expensive. — N.W. (5/05)

Rhinoceros 1166 Orange Avenue (at Loma Avenue), Coronado, 619-435-2121. This bright, hectic bistro next door to the Lamb's Players Theatre draws pre-theatre crowds as well as locals — and that may be a problem, since the rushed pace of service doesn't abate

even after the playgoers have departed. Perhaps that's why there are few appetizer choices (as though to discourage diners from spending extra time at the table). You may even be charged a "split plate" fee for sharing a first course despite ordering individual entrées. Meat and fish choices are simply prepared with ingredients of ordinary quality and generic veggie accompaniments. Why, then, is Rhino so popular? Pasta (and nothing but pasta) is the answer — that's where the kitchen shines. Very noisy when crowded; street tables are slightly quieter despite heavy traffic. Lunch and dinner daily. Reservations advised for weekends and pre-show dinners. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — N.W. (701)

Vahida's Healthy Choice Chula Vista Weekly Farmers Market, Center Street (between 3rd and Del Mar Street), 619-962-9925. Vahida calls her food Greek, but actually it's Bosnian, like her. Not that there's a huge difference. The great thing here is the market experience itself, munching away with people jostling, food smells wafting, maybe musicians plucking. Try the very Bosnian beef sausage plate. Light, flaky pastry curls around the meat but doesn't cover it. These Burch or Chevapchichiare made like the sausages of the city of Skopje, ex-

cept for some potatoes and onion added. Also good: Vahida's eggplant sandwich, chicken sandwich, and gyro plate. Operates 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Thursdays (call for hours at other locations). Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (6/06)

Zorba's Family Restaurant 100 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-422-8853. We haven't got to plate-breaking yet, but Greek dancing is alive and well at Zorba's on Fridays and Saturdays. That includes the zembekikos, where the dancer picks a glass of ouzo off the floor with his mouth and drinks it. The rest of the week? Families fill this place. They're here for the buffet, spooning up the spanakopita (spinach in deliciously flaky pastry), dolmathes, (ground beef and rice rolled in grape leaves), moussaka (eggplant, zucchini, and ground beef), and lamb. Try dividing your meal into three: first visit the salad section. Grab their real, strong-tasting olives, tabbouleh hummus, onions, lettuce, and pita bread. Return for the heavies, the lamb and beef dishes. Then leave room for baklava and other desserts. It may not be the gourmet's method, but there's no better way to fill a belly. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (2/03)

BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number.

El Rincón del Oso Mercado Hidalgo, Calle Victoria #47, Río District, Tijuana. Eating goat is an acquired taste. This little market restaurant is a good place to start acquiring. It serves kid for breakfast that's surprisingly easy on the taste buds. The best part is scooping the juices and the meat into a hot corn tortilla, adding cilantro, lime, grated onions, and a splash of salsa, and chomping in. It's meaty, slightly rich, almost gamey, like deer or buffalo, except the juices round out that gamey aftertaste. Come early morning for the best kid and the best market scenes. Open seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/01)

El Taurino Steak House Sixth Street #7531 (three blocks west of Revolución), Tijuana, 685-7075. Looking for the home of the foot-long steak? At this old-line surf-n-turf eatery a (real) wall-mounted bull's head lunges at you; his severed ears and tail hang beside him. But anchors and portholes and barcas (boats) stuccoed on the white and green



valls also emphasize the menu's "surf" side. It's all very forties. Fine linens, lifer waiters, and unchanged but good food like marinated grilled quail, shrimp al ajillo (cooked in oil, garlic, and chili), and fish steamed empapelado (in parchment paper). A must-try is the signature cabrería steak, a thin but foot-long slab with guacamole, beans, onions, jalepeño tortillas, and soup or salad. On second thought, the *media* (half) *cabrería* should be enough for most. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. — E.B. (9/04)

La Petite Cafe Avenida Constitución #720-Q, in Foreign Club Passage off Revolución between 3rd and 4th (beside Maxim's), Tijuana, 688-2171. You're in a side eddy here from the storm of Revolución among Olmec sculptures, Aztec calendars, trees, and amazing quiet. It's standard casera (homestyle) food: Spanish chicken with rice and beans, pork chops in green sauce, red enchiladas, steak ranchero, liver-and-onion stew, *chichar*rón (crisp fried pork rind) in a red sauce, and of course carne asada, but cooked well and priced amazingly low. Check the generous five-item-plus-coffee breakfast special. Three meals, all-day breakfast and lunches, seven days. Inexpensive. -E.B. (8/03)

Loncherla La Poca Lucha Munici-

Tijuana. Venturing to the far end of Tijuana's Mercado Municipal is like entering a scene from *The Sorcerer's Apprentice*. Shafts of sun penetrate the dark of an incredible kitchen of great black iron stove and giant steaming pots, and hoods gath ering into black pipes that snake up and out through the roof. But what a welcome! As you walk through the *mercado*, ladies bounce up, enticing you away to their eateries. Hang in there till you reach Loncheria La Poca Lucha, "The Small Struggle Lunch Place." Ask for carne de puerco (pork), chiles rellenos, bistek ranchero, or higado al gusto (liver), all around \$3. Pescado frito (fried fish), milanesa con papas (veal with fries), pollo frito (fried chicken), and carne asada are slightly more. Price includes soup, steaming hot corn tortillas, and a soda. Open seven days, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Inexpensive.

Mariscos el Locochón Popotla fishing village, five minutes south of Rosar-ito Beach (non-toll road), dirt road next to Fox studios. There are smarter places to eat, like Puerto Nuevo. Even in Popotla, most other eateries look more like, well, eateries. The thing about Pedro Garcia Barcelo and El Locochón is that they are what they are. His fishermen friends hand him fish straight off the boats, he sells them on a table in the sand, and if you so desire, he'll toss one into a pan of oil on a wood fire, fry a couple of corn tortillas, add cilantro, tomatoes, radishes, fried cebollitas (green onions), and presto! He'll hand you your freshest fish taco ever. Work out a price with him. He's there every day till dusk. Inexpensive. E.B. (3/04)

Salón Azteca Rosarito Beach Hotel, south end of Boulevard Benito Juárez, Rosarito, 661-612-1111. This fabled old hotel's all-you-can-eat Sunday brunch buffet offers a great excuse to check out the gorgeous architecture and meet other travelers in town. To reach the buffet, go to the left behind the registration desk to the Salon Azteca, walk in, grab a plate, and start dishing up your breakfast from the long line of cafeteria-like bins filled with gringo, gringo-Mex, real Mexican (menudo), and international specialties Expect to tip if you want something from the omelet or carving station. Next, plunk down at a table where a waiter will arrive to serve you juice and endless cups of decent coffee. Casual dress. Secure parking in hotel lot for a small extra charge. Three meals daily; brunch Sunday. Somewhat expensive for the area; Visa and Master-Card accepted. — N.W. (4/03)

Saverio's Restaurant Mediterráneo Boulevard Sánchez Taboada #3151 (at Escuadrón 201 Street), Zona Río, Tijuana, 686-6442. When Javier Plascencia Huerta wanted to open an Italian restaurant, he went all the way. He built a complete Tuscan villa right next to venerable Hacienda *Cien Años.* "But then," says Plascencia, "I got interested in what Baja California has to offer." The result: an Italian palazzo offering an interesting and changing fusion of Mediterranean-Baja food with dishes like roasted baby octopus, local oysters cooked on the mesquite grill, mesquite-grilled quail from Ensenada's valley of Guadalupe, mussels cultivated in Baja farms, and a delicious rack of lamb raised in the local San Vicente

valley. The restaurant even grows its own herbs. Dish presentation is pure art. One of the tastiest: roast duck breast in a guava sauce with a little burrito of candied leg meat, Lunch and dinner daily, Moderate

Super Antojitos 4th Street #1810 (be-Tijuana, 685-5070, Sr. Lechuga's restaurant has been around for 40 years, for good reason. Early mornings, people line up for breakfast. You enter a sort of heaven: arches, hidden lighting, glass chandeliers, even a statue of the Virgin Mary. The breakfast special, called mole poblano, includes two eggs, enchilada de mole, rice, beans, and bread or tortillas. The delicious mole, Sr. Lechuga's own, contains raisins, avocado, plantain, almonds, peanuts, thyme, and cilantro. Plus, you're drinking Sr. Lechuga's own coffee. He grows it down south. Super antoiitos means super snacks, so search out the *pastes* — pastries stuffed with *mole*, cheese, or ground meat and potatoes. Also delicious: pork rind *gorditas*. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/20)

MULTIPLE LOCATIONS

Chipotle 734 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-209-3688; 11 other locations in San Diego County. Hard to believe: This chain that McDonald's acquired cleaves firmly to the original vision of the chef who founded it: naturally raised tender meats in authentic marinades

made on-premises — it's quality all the way, and way better than most local "Berto's" (which often use cheap meat marinated by their meat-jobbers). The fresh-grilled carne asada is splendid, the carnitas outstanding. And it's "have it your way" with a wealth of choices as to what you get — burritos, tacos, bowls, fajitas — and what goes into it. You can eat indoors or outside (or take-out), drink margaritas, beer, or soft drinks, and park for free (if a slot's open). Open 10:45 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. Rock-bottom prices. — N.W. (10/05)

Karl Strauss Brewery Restaurant Columbia Street, downtown, 619-234-2739. One-time Pabst brewmeister Karl Strauss heads his own brewery and a bunch of brewery restaurants bearing his name, so you can't help but be a little wary of an over-slick operation. But at least at downtown's ivy covered bricky drink and eatery, the food's honest, tasty, and sleek, not slick. And Karl's beers are still interesting. Go for honest-but-beautiful dishes like his "Hump Day" meatloaf (Wednesday only), which comes looking like a Magic Mountain. Beer influence is everywhere. Filet mignon has an Amber Lager glaze. Ribs boast a Red Trolley Ale barbecue sauce. It can get pricey; try to hit happy hour. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. Other branches at 9675 Scranton Road, Sorrento Mesa, 858-587-2739; 5801 Armada Drive, Carlsbad, 760-431-2739; 1044 Wall Street, La Jolla, 858-551-2739.

The Living Room Coffeehouse

College Area, 619-286-8434. With deepdraft couches, Persian carpets, pictures on the wall, chunky wooden tables, and a tree-shaded patio, this Swiss-owned café is a student hangout with a lively notice board, a rental computer, and good cheap breakfast food in huge quantities. Try "The Works" omelet, with bacon, ham, onions, tomatoes, pepper, cheese on top, potatoes, fruit, and bread. Open daily, three meals, until late at night. Inexpensive. Additional locations (different management) in Hillcrest, Point Loma, and La Jolla. — E.B. (10/00)

P. F. Chang's China Bistro 4540 La opposite UTC), 858-458-9007; 7077 Friars Road, Fashion Valley, 619-260-8484. Okay, you're looking at the haunches of a giant horse right outside your corner window. And there don't seem to be any actual Chinese people among the wait staff. But this busy-busy mall-Chinese chain (130-plus restaurants) has a certain cool. You have to grudgingly like it. Those reproduction Chin Dynasty horses are really something, as are the bits of the Great Wall and the terra-cotta soldiers scattered inside. The food? The spicy ground chicken and eggplant was too salty for our taste, the "Sichuan from the Sea" shrimp too sweet, and the Cantonese roasted duck not that exciting. Yet there are jewels, like the Shanghai Street Dumplings, whose gingery chicken and sweet sauce flavors matched beautifully. And — not that it's at all Chinese — the massive "Great Wall of Chocolate" dessert will knock you over. Lunch and dinner. Moderate. E.B. (1/06)

Aphids aren't bloodsuckers. Or are they? A secret government (or the Bilderbergers) didn't stage JFK and 9/11 to escalate Vietnam and invade Afghanistan and Iraq. Or did they? Tracy Letts's sleazy thriller tromps right down the middle of these questions. It's set in an unlikely local: a motel in Oklahoma where rock cocaine-toking Agnes "hermetized herself" from her abusive excon husband. She meets kindly, distant Peter Evans. Her potential savior brings about even greater paranoia: he was a government subject at Groom Lake (i.e. Area 51) and may be carrying a bug virus of burrowing carnivore aphids. Agnes gets it (or is she just scratching sympathy sores?). Helicopters swarm overhead. Men in black? Or delusional ravings? Cygnet Theatre's crack design team does it again with a detail-rich motel room (Sean Murray), costumes ranging from frump to top shelf (Veronica Murphy), and lighting (Eric Lotze even has a strobe effect) and sound (George Ye, brilliant) designs that tell the story by themselves. The production, directed by Murray, is

full of taut suspense, including many an eloquent silence. And the performances are quite good, especially Robin Christ's chain-smoking Angie and John DeCarlo's flip-flopping Peter. Where the production sometimes flags: as if it fears being labeled a "conspiracy theorist" (possibly this country's most dominant stereotype), it stresses Bug's comic moments. Letts created down-andnearly-out characters rarely seen onstage. Emphasizing the humor of Bug marginalizes them even more, making their reactions, to real or imagined causes, often just silly. This choice gives the audience too easy an out. Sure Angie and Peter could be "hitting the pipe a little too heavy." But then again... Worth a try.



A dinner party pretty much from hell: guests arrive a day early; six-year-old (stuck in the terrible twos) screams in the next room; job promotion on the line; worries range from galaxies to a run in a stocking. Yasmina Reza's 90-minute comedy-drama shows the same evening three different ways: in the first, everyone goes berserk; in the second, there's ire and some calm; in the third, decorum reigns. The obvious reading sees each scene separately, as a parallel universe. But this makes the play just shallow variations on a theme. Much more interesting (and, I suspect, accurate) is to look at Life X 3 from above, like three-dimensional tictac-toe. Each scene becomes a layer

subtexts surface. The last stands on the other two; we see through its formality to a possible affair, shifts of status, burning resentment, even the threat of violence - all now embedded in polite banter, stable reactions, and the illusion of harmony. We read, in other words, between the lines. Each scene thickens the previous one. They grow from childhood to adulthood, from sitcom to drama (one could even give them Freudian labels: id, ego, superego). The Lamb's Players production ranks among its best in years. Surrounded by myriad stars, and a gigantic earth rolling across the rear wall, Mike Buckley's set also includes a living room on a turntable and the Milky Way spinning on the floor. The cast, smartly directed by Deborah Gilmour Smyth, shines throughout: Lance Arthur Smith as volatile (everything from a "doomed" infant to a poet) Henry; Robert Smyth's smug, contentious Hubert, Henry's boss; Glynn Bedington's Inez, as deep as she is daffy; and Colleen Kollar's manic/tender, always amazingly focused Sonia. The quartet does a kind of reverse ensemble acting. They turn 12 characters into 4 increasingly complex beings. Critic's pick.

Patriot Act: The Trial of George W. Bush

Did George Bush provide false information to Congress, authorize

citizens, violate the Geneva Convention? These are some of the allegations raised by Todd Blakesley's audience-interactive trial of the president. Actually it's a "military tribunal of universal justice" in which three juries hear evidence from both sides and render verdicts. Sledgehammer Theatre provides a realistic courtroom setting, including uniformed security personnel frisking audience members. The most moving part: nonactors testify (a woman called Bush a "special-needs president"). Magistrate Blakesley encourages questions, opinions, even hearsay, and the show gives voice to the unrehearsed passion of everyday folks and not the usual talking-head suspects. Drama, humor, and conviction often result. The least moving: many of the actors are miles from their roles and haven't a clue how to ad lib in legalese. You can tell what is scripted — when they remember their lines — and what isn't, which makes for a long, chinresting-on-open-palm evening (although each performance will depend on audience participation, the show could chop off 20 minutes and no one would miss it). A tricky irony runs throughout: along with trying to save the prez from lifelong incarceration, the defense wants to put the trial on trial. There has been "an illegal seizure of authority," they claim, by a female general. Bush and Cheney are "enemy combatants." If you play along, then you condone military tribunals and are no different. Worth a try.







Tuesdays with Morrie

Mitch Albom's 1997 book about the slow decline of his favorite professor, Morris Schwartz, to Lou Gehrig's disease, became a movie in 1999, and then a play that straddles the line between wisdom and greeting card sentiments about living and dying (Tuesdays, as my colleague Christopher Schneider once remarked in a different connection, "is relentlessly life-affirming"). We learn very little about Schwartz two of whose students at Brandeis were activists Angela Davis and Jerry Rubin, though you'd never know it - or about Albom. As written he's just a stencil-thin workaholic who learns to cry. It's almost as if the story's generic by design: as you watch you recall lost loved ones and have a real good weep during the 95 intermissionless minutes. The North Coast Rep's production begins so warm and fuzzy you hanker for ice and sandpaper. Then Robert Grossman's Morrie takes over: as his body contorts, his mind seems to brighten far beyond the facile aphorisms he doles out like Halloween candy ("embrace life and it will embrace you back"). At times Grossman's gestures and ready smile feel calculated to endear. But when Morrie counts how long he can hold his breath, or slumps into paralysis, the real thing enters the room. Mike

Sears's Mitch is more a dramatic "straight man" than a character. But Sears works between the lines, forging a credible bond between the prof and his pet student. Jeanne Reith's costumes are apt, as always, and Mia Bane Jacobs's lighting, especially late autumnal effects, ranks among the best I've seen at NCRT. Worth a try.

The Wiz

For this "reimagined" musical, Robert Brill has transformed the Mandell Weiss Theatre from a proscenium stage to an environmental space. Gleaming black and lit with lemon beams, the Yellow Brick Road winds through the theater. Objects and people drop from the sky or rise from a central circle. Oz spangles with Vegas glitter-balls; the poppies are giant, flaming red-orange petals. The production dazzles. But the story and several songs have been reduced to sound-bites. The technical always upstages the human. The entire cast, wearing Paul Tazewell's amazing, rainbow-hued costumes, obviously has the chops. Albert Blaise Cattafi's contorting Toto and Michael Benjamin Washington's Tinman come closest to realizing their roles. Others could amplify their characters' traits (Rashad Naylor's Scarecrow, David Alan Grier's Wiz, Tituss Burgess's Lion). Others, like E. Fave Butler's one-note, unscary Evillene and Heather Lee's stereotypically goofy witch Adaperle, need rethinking. In Nikki M. James, the playhouse has a splendid Dorothy. But except for her stirring "Soon As I Get Home," most of her

numbers feel abridged, or half-finished. You keep wondering when the show will let her cut loose, since it's obvious she can. The Wiz could use loosening as well. It's a hip-hop remaking of Charlie Smalls's musical, but where are the rap numbers, where's the sustained funk? Opening night felt like a white "cover album" of the 1975 version. Even with a topnotch band, the show rarely suggests that it's "been down from day one ' Worth a try.

Early Season

The new Bond is not just another pretty face, in fact is a pretty craggy face.

eginning to look a lot like Christmas. Not because *The Santa Clause 3* has come to town (I didn't, wouldn't, see it), but because movies have begun to pile up at such a rate as to obstruct justice. In cases, anyway, where justice might be deserved.

La Moustache, for one, demands a lengthier hearing. Denied. An

absurdist existential thriller adapted from his own novel by French filmmaker Emmanuel Carrère, it's a movie made out of nothing. A man (Vincent Lindon, an everyman) shaves off his soup-strainer on a sudden whim, and stands by in deepening shades of disbelief, disappointment, dejection, annoyance, anger, and perhaps madness as no one notices — a pliable metaphor of self-centeredness and self-consciousness. It has, for all its nothingness, a fast start and a sharp focus; it has intrigue; it has intensity (no great credit to that musical monomaniac, Philip Glass, whose Violin Concerto intrudes insistently); and it has its own evocative look: the flat, frigid, sunless illumination of ace cinematographer Patrick Blossier. It has, on the downside, an unsatisfactory third and final act (after an impulsive

flight to Hong Kong), although nothing to dent the central image of a man with a different, a disjunctive, level of consciousness.

Stranger Than Fiction, the first filmed screenplay of Zach Helm,

crowds in on the domain of Charlie Kaufman: a Pirandellian brainteaser about a robotic IRS auditor

(Will Ferrell, constrained by catatonia) who discovers he is a character in the work-in-progress of a blocked novelist (Emma Thompson) and is slated to die at the end of it. (A new approach, there, to the standard timetravel and second-sight conundrum: can the foreordained be averted through foreknowledge?) He discovers all this when he, and he alone, starts to hear the voice of the omniscient narrator - don't ask how or why accurately describing his life as he lives it, "but with a better vocabulary," and he then seeks help not from a therapist but from a literary theorist (Dustin Hoffman). The pedantry tends to get in the way of laughs, and the twisted logic sometimes trips up the plot developments (what does the author think she's narrating when her hero is dashing to a phone to dial her own





number?), and the voice-over prose samples do not remotely live up to the writer's reputation. Nevertheless, the improbable romance between the inflexible tax man and a civilly disobedient, tropically tattooed baker, currently under IRS scrutiny, is oddly touching, thanks in large part to the touchingly odd line readings of Mag-

gie Gyllenhaal, who can work wonders with an echoic little query like, "You don't like cookies?" And immediately after that, her sensuous recital of the goodies in her early culinary repertoire hovers breathlessly between sheer poetry and utter pornography: "Lemon chiffon cake with zesty peach icing," etc., etc. Directed by Marc

Forster (*Finding Neverland, Stay*), this is not the "average Will Ferrell comedy" to which I snidely alluded last week. This is above average.

In Fast Food Nation — a multicharacter fictionalization of Eric Schlosser's nonfiction exposé of the same name — director Richard Linklater picks up a placard and joins the

radical parade of American fictioneers from Frank Norris and Upton Sinclair and Jack London and John Steinbeck and on down. The major issues, too many to fit on one placard, are corporate corner-cutting and penny-pinching, the exploitation of undocumented workers, the brandnaming of America, the brainwashing of its citizens, and the like. Undisguisedly didactic in intent, often clunky and chunky in dialogue ("Right now I can't think of anything more patriotic than violating the Patriot Act"), it is surprisingly watchable, with its large assemblage of life-sized characters (Ashley Johnson, special mention, as a perky fast-food clerk with incipient scruples) and its smooth-flowing narrative, following two principal paths to its central arena of Cody, Colorado: the investigation by a Mickey's marketer (Greg Kinnear) into allegations of elevated fecal content in their Big One burger ("There's shit in the

meat.... This could be a problem for us") and the importation of Mexican laborers (Wilmer Valderrama, Catalina Sandino Moreno, Ana Claudia Talancón) to staff the Uni-Globe Meat Packing plant. The first path, though, trails off long before the finish, yielding to a new and unavailing path of local consciousness-raising. And the rhetorical climax on "the kill floor" is, from any angle, overkill. Particularly from the vegetarian angle.

Casino Royale, taking its title from Ian Fleming's first James Bond novel, approaches the opportunity of a new James Bond as the opportunity of a new beginning. The new Bond, Daniel Craig, is not just another pretty face, in fact is a pretty craggy face (Craiggy face, I guess that should be), and it can pretty well express itself in the bargain. Granted, noises were made about a similar rollback toward reality when Timothy Dalton came on board; and even in the midst of the reign of Pierce Brosnan, noises were made about toughening up his act. These proved to be only noises. The new noises are more. The obligatory pre-credits sequence, in black-and-white and sprinkled with flashbacks, shuns spectacle in favor of

blunt brutality; and the action to follow seems to be under no compulsion to "top" all previous action. While Judi Dench reprises the role of "M," Bond himself has only just been promoted to double-0 status (a new beginning for sure) and has yet to earn his boss's trust. There is no equivalent of "Q" and his cute presentation of the gadgets du jour. There is no casual bedding of "Bond girls," and the one romantic relationship (with the enigmatic, darkly evelined Eva Green) attains an emotional weight beyond even the all-the-way-to-the-altar affair of On Her Majesty's Secret Service. The hero's lame quips and puns, meantime, have thoroughly been expunged from the script. And "I don't give a damn" is his response to the bartender's inquiry as to whether he'd like his vodka martini shaken or stirred. All these changes are definite improvements. And yet, and yet, and .. The action, even if somewhat scaled back under the one-time Bond director Martin Campbell (Goldeneye, the beginning of the Brosnan Bonds, but scarcely a new beginning), is still more than sufficiently cartoonish. The plotting is skimpy. The whole thing runs on far too long. And then there's the fundamental question: if you want to do an alternative to James Bond, why call him James Bond? Why not put him out to pasture where at his age he belongs?

Harsh Times sanctions David Aver to resume his self-appointed role as police watchdog, this time as director in addition to screenwriter (Training Day, Dark Blue). The man he has his eye on, a very disturbed veteran of the action in Afghanistan, is not already a policeman but soon hopes to be. When, however, he receives his letter of rejection from the LAPD, he shows his commitment to law and order by tossing at a neighboring motorist the beer bottle from which he had been guzzling while driving. His motivation, to be sure, had never been to enforce laws but only to gain greater license to violate them for personal profit. And although the LAPD screeners have red-flagged him, the Department of Homeland Security, impressed by his fluency in español, might yet wave him through. Christian Bale's español is indeed impressive; and the contradictions in the character, if often uncontrollably comical, are no barrier to belief. The extravagances of Bale's go-for-broke performance (Denzel Washington got an Oscar for Training Day, didn't he?) are another matter. Sky-high.

Fur: An Imaginary Portrait of Diane Arbus, also describing itself prefatorily as "a tribute to Diane," is at pains


to deflect expectations of a straight, literal, pedestrian biography of the celebrated American photographer of front-and-center freaks (or non-freaks who, so forcibly fronted and centered. merely look like freaks). In spite of the freedom of form, the repressed-Fifties-housewife stuff feels awfully stale, and the protagonist's pursuit of her inner strangeness leads her into a conventional Beauty-and-Beast relationship, with hirsute makeup handed down from Cocteau. (Director Steven Shainberg, in his first film since the S&M romance, Secretary, thus continues the pursuit of his own inner strangeness.) Some of the intermediate steps — the arrival of a mysterious masked neighbor in the apartment upstairs, the removal of a hairball clogging the bathroom pipe — elicit a shiver or two, and Nicole Kidman in the title role is convincingly strange (even without any outside knowledge of, for example, her off-screen choice in mates). At the very least, the film has the benefit of introducing Arbus's work to a wider audience, or at any rate introducing her name to it - her actual work is conspicuously absent as well as teaching that audience how to pronounce it. Dee-ann, evidently, not Dye-ann.


A Good Year ladles out self-betterment swill to do with a cutthroat London bond trader (Russell Crowe, disconcertingly fey) who inherits from his uncle a rundown wine-growing estate in Provence, the happy stamping ground of his boyhood holidays, and who, returning there to sell the place, falls again under its spell - and under that of a hot-as-a-pistol brunette — and recaptures the magic of youth. Ridley Scott (who directed Crowe in Gladiator, too) extols the enchantments of bucolic tranquillity in a hectic visual style, and with a busy soundtrack, amounting to self-sabotage. For me, the only bright spots, exactly two of them, were the unexpected appearances of Valeria Bruni-Tedeschi (a top-line star on the continent) as the hero's French legal advisor, a role that affords her fractionally more screen time than her blink-of-an-eye appearance in Munich, plenty long enough to emit a blast of Mediterranean soulfulness. ■

Babel — Communication problems the world over. An American tourist is struck by rifle fire in Morocco, arousing erroneous worries of terrorism. An illegal-alien nanny drags along the two towheads in her care to a Mexican wedding, and runs afoul of the Border Patrol on their return. And a horny pantyless deaf-mute Japanese girl can't get a man, any man, to take an interest in her. These three storylines are fashionably "interlocked" (anyone who can recognize the voice of Brad Pitt over the telephone will immediately know the connection between two of them), and the film strategically ends in the same place, from a different point of view, as it begins, coming full circle. The illusion of complexity, for all that, could scarcely be more transparent. Mexican director Alejandro González Iñárritu, much in the manner of his Amores Perros, achieves depth only in the way that a hero sandwich achieves it; and it achieves length - almost two and a half hours of it — in the same way as a footlong at any Subway shop. Tenuous in construction,

slack and sluggish in pace, sketchy and farfetched in plot, the film does nothing to justify its epic length or its cosmic ambitions. (The Mexican storyline, particularly weak, goes nowhere until it goes bananas: a series of decisions so bad as to forfeit all sympathy for the characters, let alone for the storyteller who compelled the characters to make the decisions.) With a somewhat calmer camera than his norm, however, the director does some nice scene-setting, some impressionistic documentation of the locales, to help realize his goal in sheer duration. With Cate Blanchett, Adriana Barraza, Gael García Bernal, Koji Yakusho, and Rinko Kikuchi.

He is one of the personas of British comedian Sacha Baron Cohen on Da Ali G Show, a Kazakh TV reporter dapperly dressed in a dove-gray suit, bristlingly

mustachioed, blissfully sexist, superstitiously anti-Semitic, and not yet toilettrained (he splashes water on his face from the commode in his New York hotel room. takes a doggy-style dump in the bushes of a public park, jerks off in front of a Victoria's Secret display window, and so on), ostensibly dispatched to America to shoot a documentary for home consumption - a builtin excuse for bad camerawork. Scripted scenes, or at any rate pre-planned scenes, primarily involving Borat's obese and camera-shy producer, Azamat Bagatov (Ken Davitian), secondarily involving a slightly less obese African-American call girl (Luenell), and presumably also involving the proprietors of a Jewish B&B (how can we be sure?), alternate with unscripted per formance-art pieces, so to call them, in which assorted innocents, dupes, patsies, and joke-butts are lured into the gag unawares. These unrehearsed bits, no doubt more compelling, more riveting, more nerve-racking than the planned-out parts, naturally give rise to thoughts of their comedic antecedents and analogues: Candid Camera, the practical jokes on a Dick Clark Bloopers special, MTV's copycat Punk'd, the crank calls of any wisenheimer radio deejay, Andy Kaufman's chauvinistpig wrestling career, the Yes Men (and their eponymous film of a couple of years previous), etc. At the same time, they give rise to moral concerns — to say nothing of legal ones — that far overshadow artistic ones.


Can, as an example, an Alabama minister's wife — bluntly insulted for her dearth of pulchritude — be safely assumed to be less of a human being than our fearless guerrilla artiste, or has the latter's sexism perhaps crossed over, there, from fiction into reality? Any diversion afforded by such thoughts is all to the good, because the general impression of the film, right down to the spottiness of its laughs, and regardless



Deliver Us from Evil — Documentarist Amy Berg puts a human face on the pedophiliac priest: the extremely creepy one of Father Oliver O'Grady (familiarly, "Father Ollie"), a serial abuser, of both sexes, in several parishes in Northern California in the Seventies and Eighties (youngest victim: nine months). His willingness to talk about the case, i.e. prevaricate about the

case, from his new home in exile in Ireland (Berg, seeking indignation, not understanding, often manages to get stray children into the same frame with the man), is a coup too big for a mere 60 Minutes segment, a mere slice of the 20/20 pie, although her technique is pure TV. Flags of Our Fathers — Clint Eastwood, sorely trying the patience of anyone still hoping for a sixth installment of Dirty Harry, is plainly not yet done paying penance for the casual, callous, and prolific violence of his earlier years. And this elegiac war film makes an essential, an unmissable, piece of the entire cycle, an extraordinary course of self-examination and self-reform. beginning in earnest with the aptly titled Unforgiven, continuing through A Perfect World and, yes, The Bridges of Madison County — the modern-day saddle tramp riding a pickup instead of a pony and shooting with a camera instead of a Colt and, after slacking off for a few lesser efforts, carrying on with revived urgency through Mystic River and Million Dollar Baby. Once again, as in Bridges, opting for the camera as a weapon of choice, he tells the story of the famous Joe Rosenthal flagraising photograph from the Battle of Iwo Jima — the full story, how this flag was in

actuality a larger replacement flag for one raised already, how the battle raged on for five more weeks afterwards (contrary to the 1949 Sands of Iwo Iima with John Wavne), how the three survivors among the six faceless flag-raisers (played with great restraint by Ryan Phillippe, Adam Beach, Jesse Bradford) were brought back home to be paraded around on a bond drive, how they squirmed under the banner of "the heroes of Iwo Jima" (the best-known of them, the American Indian Ira Hayes, later celebrated in song by Johnny Cash and Bob Dylan, drank himself into an irreversible skid). how they lived out their remaining days. It is distinctly a film of, and for, its own time, gripped with the conviction that the more you know about an event, the more tainted it will get. (And let's remind ourselves here that Eastwood is the only major filmmaker to have commemorated on screen the American conquest of Grenada. Surely some special penance was owed for that. Mark it down as paid in full.) The central theme of the manufacture and marketing of "heroes," while timeless in its application to the everyday work of Hollywood, has a particular topicality in the post-9/11 world where no one in public service seems to be able to do his job anymore without being branded a hero. The point — that men are only men, that "heroes" are their creations, a label pinned on them like ribbons — is quietly and forcefully made. Yet despite its best efforts, or rather because of them, the film inescapably demonstrates the existence of heroes in the real world. One such, obviously, would be Eastwood himself, a shining example of the human capacity for growth and renewal. He, too, shoots with a camera. 2006.

Flushed Away — Animation from the Aardman Studios, not claymation, like their signature Wallace and Gromit series (and not Nick Park directing), but instead compliant, acquiescent computer animation, and a compliantly, acquiescently crasser and cruder sense of humor to go along with it. (Traces of which began to creep into the feature-length Wallace and Gromit outing a year earlier.) The basic plot premise: a housebound tux-wearing pet mouse, in his owner's absence, gets dispossessed by an intrusive sewer rat, literally flushed down the loo, to discover an alternative, miniature London in the underground, plus a feisty feminist mouse, a villainous toad and his toadies, a French-accented frog (get it?), among others. The Prestige — Not the best film of its year to deal with the subject of magic and to feature both Scarlett Johansson and Hugh Jackman. That distinction would belong to Woody Allen's Scoop, which was unchallenged as well (except insofar as the air pressure in Jessica Biel's lips may have challenged Scarlett Johansson's) by that intervening magic film, The Illusionist. Between the two also-rans, it's pretty near a toss-up, two turn-of-the-century period pieces tangled up in their compulsive twists and turns. Christopher Nolan, the present director, is somewhat less adept at concealing his tricks, despite trying diligently to lose the viewer in a maze of flashbackswithin-flashbacks. Even had he succeeded his reliance on the plot expedience of dead ringers is taken to lengths of absurdity surpassing even daytime soap operas. Lengths, to be more exact, of the flightiest science fiction. The plot premise of a professional and personal rivalry between a couple of London stage magicians (Christian Bale, Christopher Nolan's Batman, in addition to Jackman) is fractionally more involving than the hanky-panky of the separated lovers in The Illusionist, and Michael Caine adds a touch of class, David Bowie a touch of mustache, 2006.

forts of the newly elected Tony Blair to compel the Royal Family ("a bunch of freeloading, emotionally retarded nutters,3 in the view of Mrs. Blair) to behave like human beings: "Will somebody please save these people from themselves?" Helen Mirren and Michael Sheen embody Her Majesty and the Prime Minister to two T's. In support of them, James Cromwell at least looks the part of Philip, but plays only one note, and Alex Jennings is a bit short in the snout (in complete contrast to Cromwell) but is otherwise credibly dyspeptic as Charles. The plentiful humor, out of deference to history and living persons, is very mild. 2006.

Raiders of the Lost Ark — Director Steven Spielberg and executive producer/co-writer George Lucas pay homage to the cliffhanger serials of the Thirties and Forties - and they pay handsomely, pumping the project so full of money, production values, and technical razzle-dazzle that it no longer remotely resembles its grade-B models. Not intending exactly a spoof, but not maintaining entirely straight faces either, Spielberg/Lucas seem to want to play both sides of the street, to have both the innocent thrill and the sophisticated titter. Some will find that this two-facedness tends to lower the level of excitement, that although the action is consistently lively it is also without real suspense, and that the viewer is always required to meet the moviemaker more than halfway and fake a response that otherwise would never be extracted by such rudimentary perils as a shower of poison darts, a roomful of human skeletons, a blanket of furry spiders, an army of sadistic Nazis photographed with shadows crawling up their cheeks. The essential point to be made about Raiders is that it is really just a kiddie movie — a kiddie movie de luxe, but a kiddie movie all the same. With Harrison Ford and Karen Allen. 1981.

Running with Scissors - Splashy feature debut for the man behind the cabletelevision series Nip/Tuck, writer-director Ryan Murphy, a hey-look-at-me cannonball, adapted from the "memoir" of Augusten Burroughs. Set in the Seventies, it spans his prepubescence ("I guess it doesn't matter where I begin," the narrator comments in voice-over, "because nobody's going to believe me anyway") into his gloomily gay adolescence. In specific, the breakup of his nuclear family - an alcoholic academic father and a psychobabbling self-deluding poet manqué mother ("Augusten, your mother was meant to be a very famous woman") — and his subsequent placement in the foster care of the mother's crackpot analyst, whose first arrival on the scene parodies the arrival of Max von Sydow in The Exorcist. (True to the period, for sure.) The boy's second home is no stabler, a pink-painted monstrosity that accommodates a haggard hausfrau who never misses a day of Dark Shadows and snacks on dog kibble; two nubile daughters, one coquettishly virginal and one candidly tarty; a cat named Freud; a perennial Christmas tree in the parlor; a never-diminishing pile of dishes in the kitchen; the doctor's private sanctuary known self-explanatorily as his "masturbatorium"; and a trail of neurotic clients prominently including a brooding predatory homosexual. The basic assumption, trendy and trite as can be, is that the more eccentric, the more lunatic the vision of family life, the more truthful and insightful, the more relevant and revealing, it must be. (And never mind how tortuous the route to a punch line: the sole purpose of the dragged-out practical joke of a cat-meat

stew is to enable the humorless homosexual to huff off with an "I don't eat pussy!") Annette Bening, whose presence tends to point up the kinship with American Beauty, puts on quite a show as the biological mother, running the gamut from the irrepressibly tempestuous ("Get the rage on the page, women," she rails at her fledgling poets' circle) to the chemically tranquillized, with nary a misstep along the way. This is a portrait which, floridness notwithstanding, remains recognizably and humorously human. In most of the rest, the floridness overgrows and obscures. The Science of Sleep - Michel Gondry, the director of Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind and less memorably Human Nature, sets out to demonstrate he can be just as wacky and braintwisty without Charlie Kaufman as his scriptwriter, with, instead, only himself as scriptwriter. The blur of dream and reality demonstrates that, all right, but at a cost of increased tedium and irritation. (An unsteady handheld camera no doubt factors into the cost.) The dream scenes, incorporating a variety of animation techniques, are inventive, intelligent, informed, yet also invariably overstuffed, and not just in the literal sense of the stop-motion straw pony or the plump pillow typewriter. The wispy plot thread has to do with the amorous hankering of a graphic artist and crackpot inventor (mindreading helmets, time machine, and the like) for his next-door neighbor, a twosome seemingly made for each other: Stéphane and Stéphanie. Steve Buscemi and Catherine Keener, respectively, play a director and actress whose personal lives precociously intrude into the "real" indie they're making.

The revisionist Chinese movie Shower puts a kinder, gentler edge on the classic Yellow Earth. Where Yellow Earth justifies Chinese totalitarianism to combat male chauvinism, Shower implies technology will help neighbors survive redevelopment. How do SoCal developers differ from communists? Communist propaganda relies less on romantic street names, more on laughs.

Adam Sandler, Warren Beatty, and Nicolas Cage recently made Frank Capra-esque movies in which beatitudes beat corporate cynicism. My favorite Capra-corn comes with jalapeño in Robert Redford's The Milagro Beanfield War. Northern New Mexico shot in available light makes the hometown look worth fighting for.

The documentary Tailenders is about Gospel Recordings, a missionary organization founded in 1939 that uses low-tech audio devices to evangelize indigenous communities in India, Mexico, and the U.S. The filmmaker, utilizing her own voiceover, carefully and subtly exposes and critiques the connections between capitalism, environmental exploitation, and missionary activities. This DVD is a must-see, for the information it contains and for the subtle, poetic filmmaking techniques and structure.

The Last Atomic Bomb won the Best Documentary award at the San Diego Asian Film Festival. The film concentrates on the first-person narratives of two Nagasaki survivors. Powerfully, they return to where they were when the bomb was detonated to tell their horrific remembrances of the violent destruction of their homes, families, and friends. Their narratives, although graphic, show great respect for those who died and the suffering of those they knew. A moving, sad, and urgent documentary.



aesthetic plane, quite distinct from the financial plane, is not sufficiently higher than that of Mr. Potatohead. The hero, Jack Skellington, a/k/a The Pumpkin King, looks unfortunately like Whitley Strieber's extraterrestrial in a pinstripe suit and on stilts. And his many, varied, and grotesque cohorts are first and foremost a manifestation of Hollywood's besetting vices of overabundance and overindulgence: too many, too varied, too grotesque. Another, more basic, manifestation of these is the mere fact that the film is a feature and not a short. Because it is a Disney film, of course, and an animated film, there seems to be some immutable law that it must have songs, songs, and more songs — written (and some of them sung) by Danny Elfman, but sounding more like Andrew Lloyd Webber in search of a melody ("I don't believe what's happening to me,/ My hopes, my dreams, my fantasy!"). These musical interludes are no doubt the greatest offenders in the torture-rack stretch to feature-length, but the gaudy displays of wealth and expenditure run them a close second. In its bare bones, the premise seems viable enough. Completely separate towns, according to Burton's fantasyland geography, are responsible for planning and carrying-off the

separate holidays on the calendar, until one year the Halloween mastermind gets it into his head to abduct Santa Claus and usurp Christmas. There is some dark-toned fun (not darker than TV's The Simpsons or than Charles Addams's New Yorker cartoons, and not more fun, either) when the revised Christmas plans begin to go awry. And by and by there's a traditional and respectable fairy-tale message to do with accepting yourself as you are. The delivery of that

message, however, and for that matter the setting-up of the basic premise, are garbled in the extreme. One does not envy parents who must try to explain the thing to their young. 1993

Señalan ataques

Debido a la serie de crimen y actos en contra de hispanos de San Diego, especificamente en el Norte del Condado, activistas y grupos pro defensores de derechos humanos se unieron para protestar afuera del Ayuntamiento de Vista.

Recientemente la activista y ex candidata a regidora de la ciudad de Vista, Tina Jillings, fue atacada en su residencia, donde ella y su esposo fueron amedrentados y sus propiedades sufrieron daños por personas no identificadas.

Jillings denunció inmediatamente estos actos pero la oficina del alguacil en Vista se rehuso a catalogar los hechos como crimen de odio.

"Han sido muchos los actos que los racistas Minuteman han hecho en contra de nuestra gente", comentó el activista Enrique Morones. El siguiente paso que los grupos pro derechos de los migrantes harán es exigir a altos funcionarios tomar control de estos hechos ya que muchos actos violentos que son racistas han quedado impunes.

De acuerdo a Morones, la procuradora general del Condado, Bonnie Dumanis, debe de tomar cartas en estos asuntos que están trayendo violencia y afectando a las comunidades más vulnerables.



Rueda el Trolley

A pesar de la fuerte oposición que en un principio tuvo la aparición de tren ligero en la región, porque se dudaba que fuera reductible para la ciudad, hoy el Trolley de San Diego se ha convertido en un ejemplo de eficiencia y calidad en la nación.

El Sistema de Transporte Público (MTS) transporta a más de 80 millones de usuarios al año es sus tres líneas de tren ligero y un basto sistema de rutas de camiones que circulan a lo largo de esta entidad.

"No pensaban que fuera útil, pero ahora al ver los millones de pasajeros se han dado cuenta que estaban equivocados, es un orgullo tener un sistema eficiente que debe de seguir creciendo para servir a más usuarios", dijo Leon Williams, fundador del MTS.

Más de 120 años han pasado desde que las primeras carrozas de caballos transitaban llevando gente a lo largo de la avenida 5 y la calle D (ahora Broadway) en el centro de San Diego.

A pesar de las oposiciones el tren ligero reapareció en la región en 1981 gracias a los esfuerzos legislativos del entonces senador estatal Bill Mill.

"Fue dificil lograr convencer a la gente de que era necesario contar con un tren que sirviera localmente", narró Williams.

Hace 25 años en julio de 1981 el tren ligero de San Diego resurgió en la entidad transportando pasajeros de la frontera en San Ysidro al centro de San Diego.

- The chosen professional interest of biologist David Scholnick of Pacific University (Forest Grove, Ore.) is in how shrimp act when they get an infection, which he gauged by building a tiny treadmill in order to run crustaceans through their paces to measure blood lactate levels. "As far as I know," Scholnick told LiveScience.com in October, "this is the first time that shrimp have been exercised on a treadmill." To increase the shrimps' stress, Scholnick designed tiny backpacks out of duct tape but still found that healthy shrimp could go for about an hour without fatigue.

Great Art!

- Simon Pope's "Gallery Space Recall" exhibit at the Chapter Arts Centre in Cardiff, Wales, is an empty room, with patrons called upon to supply the art by imagining another art show they have seen so that, wrote Pope, the two exhibits "exist at two locations simultaneously, both here and there." Pope wrote that the exhibit suggested the brain-injury disorder "reduplicative paramnesia," in which a person has a delusional belief that something exists at two places at once.

Campaign Roundup

Sitcoms: In October, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, in Pittsburgh to campaign for U.S. Sen. Rick Santorum, antagonized anti-Santorum demonstrators by blowing them a kiss, and in the ensuing chaos, Bush was forced to take refuge in a train station supply closet. ... Kansas state Rep. Vaughn Flora was charged with a misdemeanor after an October political event when he allegedly roughed up an anti-abortion protester dressed as a cockroach. ... In Tampa in August, publicaccess TV host Tony Katz threw a chair at his guest, county-commission candidate Joe Redner, hitting him in the head (after he had called Redner a liar and Redner had called him fat).

Family Values: Republican U.S. Rep. Don Sherwood of Pennsylvania was trailing in his race for reelection, owing in large part to the

lawsuit filed two years ago by his 29-year-old mistress. She alleged that the supposedly happily married Sherwood beat and strangled her. Sherwood settled the lawsuit and acknowledged the affair but denied any abuse. ... Ohio Democrats had to scramble in September to find a replacement to run for a U.S. House seat after their original nominee, Stephanie Studebaker, was jailed along with her husband after the couple brawled at their home in Dayton.

Government in Action

 The Havering town council in Romford, England, prepared a 300-page report in October, which was the result of a 12-month investigation to find out who had heckled a speaker at a zoning meeting by making "baaa" noises. The authors said they had narrowed the list of suspects. ... In September, London's mayor Ken Livingstone defended his downtown anti-pigeon program, which consisted of empowering two hawks to scare the birds away, even though the three-year cost of the program (including a handler) was the equivalent of more than \$400,000, which reduced the menace by 2500 pigeons, or about \$170 a bird. A civic group in Vienna, Austria, gathered 157,000 signatures on petitions in May and presented them to city officials to encourage a government program for cleaner streets. Under the proposal, the government would assign the populace the task of counting and mapping dog droppings as a first step to greater penalties for owners who fail to clean up after their mutts. Critics were pessimistic because citizens wanted to count and map dog droppings.

Thinning the Herd

The latest casualty of quick-draw practice: a 19-year-old man in Evans, Colo., in September, who, working out in front of a mirror, somehow fatally shot himself in the head. ... The latest pedestrian-train collisions: (1) a 30-year-old woman in Little Rock, Ark., in October, who was walking along the tracks carrying a beer and listening to music with headphones, and (2) an

18-year-old man in Kenosha, Wis., in September, who first left the tracks well in front of the train but then returned, stood on the tracks, and made a finger gesture at the conductor.

Police Blotter

 In October, Robert Russel Moore, 33, was sentenced to ten years in prison for the burglary of an Arby's in Prince Frederick, Md. Moore was assistant manager of the restaurant and was identified by clues from the surveillance tape. Four employees said they recognized the burglar's body shape, clothing, and (when he bent over) the distinctive top portion of his buttocks, as being those of Moore. The owner of the restaurant said he had had to counsel Moore "more than once" about the inadvertent exposure of his butt crack.

The Continuing Crisis

In October, California environmentalists and health officials said they might have to undertake a one-by-one investigation of septic tanks in the movie-star-populated Malibu community in order to find the leaks that have been fouling the coastline. According to an Associated Press report, the final decision won't be made until officials test the seawater to determine whether the sewage has human DNA or is from animals, such as runoff from chicken farms, which is the preferred explanation of actress-vegetarian Pamela Anderson.

- In 2004, Bruce McMahan, then 65, whose success with his McMahan Securities hedge fund in the 1990s made him one of America's wealthiest men, married (perhaps unofficially) his daughter (who had been born of a 1968 McMahan fling) following a two-year affair (according to a September report in Florida's Broward-Palm Beach New Times, based on court documents generated when the daughter sought a breakup). McMahan denied the affair and the marriage, but New Times found many wedding photos and marriage-acknowledging e-mails, and reference to a vibrator laden with "evidence." All lawsuits relating to the matter were settled and the files sealed by the court in early September.

A 33-year-old woman was detained by police in September after complaints by residents at a mobile-home park in Michigan City, Ind., that she had been having sex in an untinted-windowed limousine on one of the park's streets, in front of what grew to be a large crowd, mostly yelling at her for her indecency. At one point, according to police, the otherwise-occupied woman yelled back at the crowd defiantly that she was 'doing adult business" and "I've got to do what I've got to do."

Least Competent People

 Slapstick: (1) Inspecting the Dukovany nuclear power plant in Moravia in September, an unnamed American official with the International Atomic Energy Agency wandered away from the group and fell into a water tank. (2) In September, firefighters in Spokane, Wash., rescued a worker whose head had become stuck in a water meter enclosure for about four hours. (3) In October, when Turkey's prime minister Tayyip Erdogan fainted from low blood sugar, his security team rushed him to a hospital but mistakenly locked him and the keys inside his fortified car; after they pounded on it for a while, a nearby construction worker with a sledgehammer saved the day.

- In October, health officials in China again warned citizens against the increasingly popular but seriously painful leg-stretching "Ilizarov procedure," believed to add as much as a couple of inches to a person's height. The patient's leg is deliberately broken and affixed to a rack, with the leg stretched slightly every day so that the bones fuse together to cover the separated space, lengthening the leg. Said one 33-year-old, five-foottall woman in 2002, aiming for four more inches: "I'll have a better job [and] a better husband. It's a long-term investment."

INTO THE BUSH — PART 2

Our camp the second night is more beautiful than the first. We stop midafternoon where there is a small seasonal pond in front of us. Life is all about water. Elephants, giraffe, kudu, impala, baboon, hippo, crocodile, wildebeest, and an array of birdlife entertain us. Large marabou storks are fishing along the water's edge for their supper. We start the campfire so that we will have good coals to cook with.

Impala have been coming to the pond to drink. They look around for some time before drinking quickly and leaving to continue grazing. One impala wanders into deeper water for a drink. There are at least a dozen crocodiles on the far bank. One of them waits until the impala is facing the other way and quietly slips into the water. The croc comes up behind the impala, grabs it with his huge jaws, and twists it over and over again until it drowns.

We watch as the crocodile drags the impala onto the bank. It starts to chomp away. Other crocodiles move in and a series of fights start. Different crocs are pulling at different parts of the impala. Some retaliating and defending go on, but the situation is hopeless. About six different crocodiles get parts of the impala. In the end, the hunter has to settle for a leg and shoulder.

Twilight is approaching, and we are getting ready for supper. With the sunlight gone, some of the hippos have come out of the pond and are grazing close to us. When the fire dies down enough to cook supper, the hippos move in closer. We throw more wood on the fire to keep them away. The cycle is repeated until we feel comfortable enough to cook.

It is worth the wait. We feast on fillets and vegetables that

were simmered in fine red wine. We enjoy the same meal for breakfast the next morning, only the portions are smaller. A herd of about 30 wildebeests takes almost an hour to wander our way, moving at a grazing pace. Something, perhaps a lion moving behind the bushes, startles them, and they all stampede back the way they came.

We break camp when the first elephant comes back for a morning drink. Charlie wants to keep the sun on his left as we head west, back to one of the supply roads to Moremi Game Reserve. After about an hour and a half, some concern is raised that we haven't met the road yet. After stopping for a cold beer, we head for what looks like some opening in the bush. Much of the landscape can look very similar, but we pass a striking, low-level sand crater. The remains of two long-dead trees in the middle of the crater look like two tables waiting for guests to arrive for lunch. It's an eerie setting, but finding the road is on our minds, so we pass up another rest break.

About an hour later, the going is getting rough, with

places that are tough to go through. Charlie is now taking an odd glance at the fuel gauge. We know the road has to be close. Indications look good when we come across a set of tire tracks. Charlie gets out to make sure they are not our tracks. They are Land Rover tracks, but not ours. Our spirits are lifted as we continue.

We are making good



time because we don't have to worry about getting stuck in sand sinkholes or which way to go. The road should run into us at any moment. Still, Charlie gets out of the vehicle twice to confirm that these are not our tracks. Fallen branches over the tracks convince me. We come steaming around some bushes and out into the open. What do we see, but

our two tables sitting in the crater. It took us an hour and a half to go in one big counter-clockwise circle.

We are beside ourselves. We have sticks in the sand measuring shadows and the direction of the noonday sun. Which way is west? Charlie and I are like two ends of the compass, pointing in opposite directions. Ten more minutes in the

> heat, another cold beer, and we are able to agree on the direction we hope is west, toward the road.

Charlie smiles, puts the brakes on, and we stop right in front of the road. We sit back and put our feet up on the dash and have the best cold beer of the trip. We

knew we would find it. When we would find it was the concern. Soon Sally, our Land Rover, is booting down the road like she can smell pavement. We need to get cleaned up, go out for supper, share a few stories of the trip with friends, and find out what they have been doing for the weekend.



The next thing that starts to happen is rents rise, and when they do, more buyers move into the purchase market. We've already seen some of this. Also, some sellers have moved out of the market. A few weeks ago, I was seeing active listings total about 23,800 locally, and they're down to 22,500 now. Furthermore, the number of buyers has risen by about 10 percent or so in the past couple weeks. Net result: We were at 38 or 40 sellers per buyer most of the summer. Last week it dropped to 34, and this week it's at 33. This is starting to look like it might be a trend, and when the ratio of sellers to buyers drops enough, prices are going to stabilize, the period of best deals will be over, and people are going to rush back into the market. It's got a long way to go, but where I have predicted Spring 2008 as the most likely market recovery point locally, I'm thinking now that it will more likely be some time next year, most likely early summer based upon current

trend lines. Those who are thinking that we're going to see \$200,000 detached single family homes in San Diego are most likely going to be disappointed. I've said all







He called me his "whiskey priest" and my regulars "the beleaguered Babbitts of my parish."

<u>By John Brizzolara</u>

Allow me to list the many ways for which we thank the deity (or agnostics thank "goodness," a safe but pointless exercise, pretty much like being agnostic in the first place), or don't allow me and go on to the used RVs ads. I'm thinking of my years as a bartender, mostly in New York, when Fridays for me might well fall on a Monday or Wednesday. As in foxholes, there are no atheists or agnostics behind the stick, and gratitude is a given at the end of four or five shifts that may not end until five a.m. Gratitude, as an emotion, will surface if for no other reason than at that point — the analogous Friday night — one can come around the other side of the bar, sit on a barstool, and drink oneself stupid.

I got the job in August of 1974, the day Nixon resigned. The bar, at the corner of 68th Street and Columbus Avenue, had for years been a bookie's joint called Maloney's or Mahoney's. A bank of phone booths against the south wall attested to this. Before the place was limply renamed Dazzel's by the German owner's gay boyfriend, Mahoney's (or Maloney's) was a 28-foot-long, cigarette-scored oak bar lined with ashtrays, shots and beers, and snap-brimmed hats. When Walter Feist took over, he brought in hanging ferns and put quiche on the menu. The snap-brimmed hats disappeared in a smoky, lingering grumble. The phone booths were torn out, and a sidewalk café was installed, the first along what became Restaurant Row on Columbus

My singer's record company went bankrupt and I was out of a job. I lied and got hired as a waiter. It lasted for a day. I was the world's worst waiter, and my career ended in a fistfight with a kid from New Jersey who stiffed me. Feist followed me out to the curb, where the kid laid between two parked cars, and fired me on the spot. On the same spot he hired me as a bartender. If I'm making myself out to be a tough guy, this was far from the case. The kid was the size of my little sister, with a mouth like Roseanne Barr, and I had all the restraint and sensibilities of a 23-year-old rock musician from Chicago.

I was taken under the wing of a 31-year-old bartender named Steve Carabin, who would die a year later from cirrhosis of the liver. I did well and was accepted in the Upper West Side neighborhood, which at that time was mostly actors and Puerto Rican families. I did well for the same reasons I failed at that line of work later in California: I was surly, fast, and impersonal unless I genuinely liked you. I liked the Puerto Rican guys and the grips from the soap operas across the street: All My Children and One Life to Live — many of whom were the same people. The actors, some of them famous, tended to be neurotic and in some cases funny. It never became a stone gay bar but evolved into a spot for diehard street gamblers who couldn't adjust to off-track betting and for soap-opera employees during the day, Lincoln Center theater attendees in the evening, after-theater customers, and, between midnight and two, pretty much gay. Between two and four in the morning the clientele was cab drivers, hookers (a lot of transvestites), pimps, off-duty and undercover cops.

The first time it happened was with a guy also named John, a translator at the U.N. (several dialects of Chinese, though he was not Asian), and an unhappy, intellectual, frustrated writer and miserable closet case who refused to broach the subject head-on. A few times I had to shut him down when he launched into fag cracks. I liked John and still feel bad about what happened to him; I wonder if there was something I might have said that would have changed it. Or was there something I did say that contributed to his suicide? He called me his "whiskey priest" and my regulars "the beleaguered Babbitts of my parish."

The last time I saw him we were sitting in a back booth after five in the morning, slowly draining the weight out of a green bottle of Remy-Martin. We were talking about coulrophobia, which is, I think, the fear of clowns, "I wanted to be a priest when I was little; not a priest like you, though."

"Commendable."

"But then I had this vision, maybe it was a dream, of God as a sadistic ringmaster and me an evil clown. I still can't get past that. It's why I can't go back



to the Church."

That was basically all I remember from the conversation except that I suggested (too flippantly, as the sun was coming up and I remembered I had a pregnant wife at home) that he get laid. "Aleesha seems nice." She was a hooker who was probably a guy. But she was nice, and John seemed to like her. I said it for laughs, I think.

Anyway, John dated her. He took her to Avery Fisher Hall for Mozart. I heard they had stopped back at Dazzel's for a Remy (hers with Coke) afterward, but I was off.

It was maybe two weeks later that I heard he had jumped off the roof of his building on 72nd Street, right next door to where John Lennon was shot. Two other people, actors who were regulars of mine, killed themselves. Once in a while I still see them in old TV shows or movies from the '70s and think back on being called "Kiss o' Death Brizz" and the joint, "Kiss o' Death Dazzel's."

I ascribe much of my antisociability to my on-and-off ten years behind the bar. My last shift was about 14 years ago, when I was fired from the Old Town Mexican Café. If it wasn't a Friday, it should have been, and I say thank God.
