How to Avoid Taxes, Cruise European Seas

t's a huge boat for a tiny tax-and-secrecy haven. The new \$33 million yacht sported by David Copley, owner of Copley Press and

the *Union-Tribune*, is registered in Majuro, capital of the Marshall Islands, a republic halfway between Indonesia

(The glitzy Monaco is also a tax-and-secrecy haven, called "tax haven to the stars." Monaco is home to Richard

nomic Co-operation and Development, a research organization promoting the global economy, said that it classified only five of the world's tax-andsecrecy havens as uncooperative. One was the Marshall Islands. Another was Monaco. Both claim to be opening up.

Happy Days is the largest composite yacht ever made in the Americas, according to press materials sent out by the builder, Delta Marine Industries of Seattle. (A composite yacht is one made of space-age materials rather than the conventional steel

and Hawaii, with a population of only 60,000.

The yacht, called *Happy Days*, had a prestigious frontrow berth last summer in Monaco, according to people in the La Jolla social swim. Copley and friends have been cruising on the craft recently.

passing note for those with an interest in the dicey side of politics. First up is called the Capital Campus California Retreat, sponsored by George Mason University's Mercatus Center, an Arlington, Virginia—based think tank "focused on improving our understanding of how soci-

eties transition to prosperity and remain prosperous over time," according to a blurb on its website. Set for tomorrow and Saturday, the event is supposed to provide participants with "tools for better decision-making and an improved understanding of the interaction of law, economics, and government in California." The keynoter is ex—Democratic congressman **Tim Roemer**, a member of the 9/11 Commission.

But what has some critics in an uproar is the fact that admission to the invite-only goings-on will be provided free of charge: "Registrants will be flown from Sacramento to San Diego on the morning of Friday, January 19, 2007, arriving at the Hotel del Coronado for lunch and the beginning of the program. Participants can expect a number of interesting sessions over the course of the program, in addition to meals and receptions held throughout the weekend. On Saturday, January 20 a return flight will take participants back to Sacramento."

The lucky chosen few just happen to include key legislative staffers invited by the office of Assembly Speaker Fabian Núñez. That's raised the ire of Dirty Money Watch, an online newsletter run by **Harvey Rosenfield**, the former Ralph Naderite who's been a thorn in the side of the state's politicos, insurance industry, utility companies, and HMOs for years. Mercatus has long taken money from big oil companies, such as Koch Industries and ExxonMobil, as well as General Motors, Pfizer, and Enron. "The problem here is not that anti-regulation forces will get to say their piece," the newsletter argues. "It's that they'll say it while they have exclusive access to the top legislative aides in the capital, in a luxurious setting those staffers aren't likely to forget." ... Then, speaking of politicians, on March 1 and 2, the American Bar Association brings its White Collar Crime National Insti-

including "Lines between lobbying and corruption"; "Dealing with investigations for obstruction, perjury and making false statements"; "Finding the digital smoking gun"; and "Successful strategies for managing complex criminal fraud investigations."

Fat city *Capitol Weekly*, a Sacramento paper aimed at state government insiders, is

out with its annual list of legislative staff salaries. Among San Diego representatives, **Wade Teasdale**, ex–staff director for North County GOP senator **Bill Morrow**, ranked highest on the paper's list, with yearly pay of \$126,912. That also made him the highest-paid Repub-

lican senate employee. (The legislature's highest-paid worker is **Dan Eaton**, Assembly Speaker **Núñez**'s chief of staff, who got an 18 percent raise recently to a whopping \$200,004.) Teasdale now works for **Mark Wyland**, Morrow's successor. Next came **Myrna Zambrano**, chief of staff to Democratic senator **Christine Kehoe**, at \$93,720. Others bringing home some of the biggest paychecks included **Martin Paine**, another Morrow staffer (\$90,312); and **Deanna Spehn**, Kehoe's district coordinator and policy director and onetime staffer for GOP political consultant **Tom Shepard** (\$83,904).

All in the (football) family Since Chargers star running back **LaDainian Tomlinson** isn't going to the Super Bowl this year, he can now turn his attention to some of his other interests, which have included politics. On Jan-

uary 4, 2006, according to federal disclosure records, he gave \$2100 to the congressional campaign of **Scott Turner**, the ex-Charger seeking to replace **Randy"Duke" Cunningham** in the 50th District. Turner lost but went on to nail a job with the even-

tual general-election victor, Republican **Brian Bilbray**. Meanwhile, Tomlinson's boss, team owner **Alex Spanos**, and his son were backing **Richard Pombo**, the conservative Northern California Republican who ended up narrowly losing his congressional seat in November. Spanos kicked in a total of \$1500 in October; son **Dean**, who runs the Chargers, gave \$2100.

One family contribution interesting in light of the team's well-publicized flirtation with Las Vegas mayor **Oscar Goodman** for a new home: on October 31, Dean's son **Alexander**, a team executive, contributed \$1000 to the successful reelection campaign of Nevada senator **John Ensign**, who was running against the son of **Jimmy Carter**, a good friend of Padres owner **John Moores**.

San Diego Hotels: Under Covers

uch of the downtown hotel industry gets a "double subsidy of taxpayer support plus public assistance for its hardest workers,"

Micah Mitrosky tells me. That's one conclusion she reached after taking the Graduate Student Practicum offered by SDSU's sociology department last spring. Mitrosky calls the class her most important in the "applied track" master's degree program at the university. "It's one thing to read about a subject, but quite another to learn how to dig up material yourself," she says.

The practicum was taught by Jill Esbenshade, who decided to focus the class on San Diego's hotel industry. SDSU sociology professors "rotate" teaching the class, each choosing the focus according to an expertise. Esbenshade's choice was informed by her extensive research into labor conditions in immigrant sweatshops.

The practicum's one assignment for Mitrosky and ten other students was to participate in writing a research paper. Esbenshade divided them into three teams according to their interests: govern-

ment-data research, worker surveys, and manager interviews. The students had one semester to do their research and write the paper. Mitrosky called the assignment "the most stressful school experience I've ever had. It was so difficult working with census data that I had to get help from Nadine Misiaszek in

[SDSU's] Social Science Research Lab. She knew the syntax for writing computer programs to get data coded, allowing us to access it." A fortuitous development that helped those students doing worker surveys was a two-week picket demonstration in mid-March at Doug Manchester's Grand Hyatt, San Diego's largest hotel. Though not a strike or work stoppage, the event put demonstrating workers outside the hotel, where the students could hand them surveys and interview them without interrupting their work.

Eventually the students wrote a 46-page, single-spaced report they titled "Researching the Hotel Industry in San Diego: Profits, Pain and Pillows." The report starts off by detailing figures like the following. In 2005, "27 million visitors spent [5.8] billion dollars" in San Diego. "Sixteen million of these visitors spent at least one night.... [There] are currently 452 hotels and motels with over 54,000 available rooms in the county. Another 1500 rooms are offered through casinos, spas and bed and breakfasts."

"In 2005," according to the report, "San Diego's [hotel] occupancy rate was 72.3 [percent] while nationwide, the occupancy rate stood at 60.7 percent. These figures are especially impressive given that San Diego County added more hotel rooms than any of the top 25 [markets]...."

Turning to those employed,

"The local hotel workers' union...estimates that there are currently 23,815 full-time service hotel workers in the county, 2500 of whom are unionized. In terms of numbers of employees," says the report, "San Diego has experienced growth at a faster rate than California.... According to quarterly figures, from 2002 to 2004, the number employed in the California accommodation [industry] increased by 7.68 percent, while San Diego demonstrated a 10 percent increase."

The students' paper argues that much of the hotel industry's growth has taken



The report is a broad indictment of the industry for producing huge profits for ownership but putting a tight-fisted and indifferent face toward its bottom-rung employees. It especially highlights the plight of house-keepers, mostly women, who clean up after guests and prepare rooms for new occupants.

In their study, the students found the median hotel housekeeper wage in San Diego to be \$10.63 per hour. But their portrayal of callousness to workers' injuries struck me as the report's most damning element. A section of the paper called "Isabella's Experience" documents painful hand and lower-back injuries to one of the housekeepers. The injuries result primarily from bending over and lifting mattresses in making beds. "Isabella," write the students, "is currently taking both over the counter and prescription medications for the pain in her hand, taking one pill three times a day. Over the past month, she has had severe pain in her lower back and severe headaches, as well as pain throughout the rest of

her body."

"Margarita's Experience" recounts a housekeeper suffering tendonitis twice during her employment at the Manchester Grand Hyatt. "Her hands and arms are constantly inflamed," according to the report. "Her lower back is in persistent pain since her duties as a housekeeper require her to bend down continuously throughout the day.... 'They [the hotel] are physically killing us,' Margarita says."

The students acknowledge that these stories are subjective and that their sample of workers was skewed by interviewing only workers at the Manchester Grand Hyatt. But the literature they reviewed on the condition of hotel housekeepers nationally agrees with the personal stories. The students cite a December 2005 article in the *San Francisco Chronicle* that stated, "There were 17,980 injuries among

master suite with lounge and dining area on the upper deck, and six large staterooms on the main deck. An elevator travels through all four decks. It requires a crew of 12.

The yacht's official owner is KABOOM L.L.C. (limited liability company) of Majuro. The little nation brags that "Marshall Islands law statutorily exempts non-resident yacht-owning corporations from taxes." Secrecy is guaranteed: there are "no publicly accessible records" and no requirements for annual filings.

It takes only a day to set up a company online at a cost of \$450. "According to our correspondent, The Trust Company of the Marshall Islands, Inc., an entity by the name of KABOOM L.L.C. was formed in May of 2005," says Melissa A. Hurst, general counsel for International Registries, Inc., the maritime and corporate administrator of the Marshall Islands. Under the secrecy laws, she could not reveal the name of KABOOM's beneficial owner. However, on May 20, 2005, an entity called KABOOM II L.L.C., with David Copley as registered agent, was filed with the California secretary of state.

KABOOM, owner of the yacht, was set up under the no-tax rules in the Marshalls. "The tax benefit is the fact that the Marshall Islands is a zero-tax jurisdiction," says Hurst. The Marshalls boast of other financial benefits. For example, the islands have a reciprocal agreement with the United States: Marshallsregistered pleasure yachts are exempt from U.S. Customs formal entry and clearance procedures.

"If you're traveling to Europe and other places, there could be taxes incurred in every port of call," says Jonathan Ives, executive director of the Washington-based Northwest Yacht Brokers Association. "So they register in the Marshall Islands in order that they won't be taxed when they enter these ports." The close relationship between the United States and Marshall Islands helps facilitate such arrangements. The Marshalls are among the five leading ship registries today, along with Panama, Liberia, the Bahamas, and Greece. The

island republic expects to supplant Liberia in second place within four years.

"When a boat is being run

all over the world, it is not unusual to have yachts registered in the name of an L.L.C. in a tax haven," says a San Diego yacht salesman. Under a state law recently extended through June 30 of this year, the yacht owner can only avoid a sales or use tax if the craft is out of the state for at least a year from the date of its purchase. Delta was to deliver the craft to Copley in the first quarter of 2006. Thus, his first year is almost over. If the vessel was exclusively used outside of California in the year since its purchase, it is exempt from a sales or use tax. (A use tax is imposed in place of a sales tax when a product is purchased out of a state. Copley would be subject to a use tax but almost certainly won't have to pay it because the craft has been cruising European waters, far from California.) Just three years ago, a yacht had to be out of state for only 90 days to avoid the sales or use tax. "When they changed it, more and more registered in foreign jurisdictions. It's kind of unpatriotic to some extent."

Says the Offshore Yacht Registry Newsletter, "Registering offshore allows for a vessel to be purchased while paying no sales tax." Throw in the avoidance of property taxes, and the savings could be almost 10 percent, says the publication. A few plutocrat-obsequious states such as Delaware exempt yachts from sales and

use taxes, but by registering offshore, "The identity of the true owner of the yacht will be protected" from most government agencies, lawsuits, and foreign courts, the publication claims.


A major reason a yacht owner registers under a foreign flag "is the ability to hire a foreign crew," says Cris Wenthur, San Diego attorney specializing in maritime and tax law. "You're not subject to minimum-wage requirements. You don't have state withholding for employment taxes." By registering the yacht offshore, the owner is spared all kinds of employment-related paperwork and costs.

"We assess yachts [for property tax] if they are physically here most of the time, and we don't care where they are registered," says Greg Smith, county assessor/recorder/clerk. That tax is 1.1 percent of total valuation each year.

After searching her database, Vickie Wittmayer, property assessment specialist in Smith's office, says, "We have nothing under either KABOOM or David Copley." Thus far, the craft has avoided the property tax in San Diego, probably because it hasn't been anchored here.

As a nonresident of Washington, Copley would "trigger no tax liability" in that state unless he spent half a year there, according to Mike Gowrylow, spokesman for the Washington Department of Revenue. But would Copley moor in gloomy Seattle when



he loves to romp with the jet set in sunny Monaco?

Copley would have to pay the use tax in California (8 percent of \$33 million) unless the vessel was gone for a full year, according to John Hrabe, communications director for Board of Equalization member Michelle Steel. In any case, the Board of Equalization will not reveal use-tax records of individual Californians.

Copley's new yacht is not even registered with the U.S. Coast Guard, according to the Dona Jenkins Maritime Document Service, based in San Diego. Maybe Copley does not intend to bring his yacht into U.S. waters. That doesn't mean he will take a permanent vacation from his company. He could park the yacht and fly back at any time. Or do some work electronically, as many executives do.

Copley Press did not return calls for comment. Delta Marine refused to say anything beyond its press releases, which discussed the vessel's opulence but did not identify its owner. ■

housekeepers and maids across the country in 2004 that led to days missed from work, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The numbers are probably far higher...because workers are reluctant to report their injuries for fear of being reprimanded or fired." A study of 1000 hotel workers in Las Vegas by the University of California at San Francisco Medical School "indicated that three out of four hotel housekeepers experience 'very severe pain' due to increased working conditions."

The increased workload, according to the report, has resulted largely from a new type of luxury bed that became popular in the hotel industry during the last few years. First installed as the "Heavenly Bed" by Westin Hotels, the new bed was part of a branding technique to develop loyalty among customers. A June 2005 Travel and Leisure article called "Battle of the Beds" labeled the attraction as "an oasis for the weary traveler"

and described it as "a bright white duvet, a down blanket, five feather-and-down pillows, three 230-thread count sheets (one sheet is laid over the blanket, a practice known as triple sheeting), and a custom-designed 121/2 -inch-thick Simmons mattress with 900 individual coils."

But hotel housekeepers see

the bed quite differently. Luxury beds such as the Heavenly Bed require workers to lean much farther over them and to lift their heavy mattresses as they tuck in sheets. Recently the Manchester Grand Hyatt, a nonunionized hotel, increased the number of rooms housekeepers are required to clean each day from 16 to 24. To compensate, management reduced the tasks the workers must complete in each room. As a result, the hotel could say that workloads were not becoming greater. What housekeepers found, however, was that "stayover" customers often complained to them, instead of management, that certain work was not being completed. Unfulfilled expectations, such as having sheets changed every day, ended up costing workers tips. In a contrasting attitude, managers told the students in interviews that the luxury beds were not a problem.

Master's degree student Marilisa Navarro speaks with me about interviewing the housekeepers, which she did in both Spanish and English. "I found a mix of workers," she says, "some very outspoken, some concerned about the hotel punishing them, and some not willing to talk at all." Navarro recalls that there were Tijuana residents among those she interviewed, and of those living in San Diego, most were on some form of public assistance, such as Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (created by the federal welfare reform law of 1996, which combined the services of Aid to Families with Dependent Children and Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training).

I ask Navarro how she thinks a study of housekeepers by the Manchester Grand Hyatt would turn out. And would the hotel be able to marshal facts backing up its point of view? Navarro tells me that the Grand Hyatt's management refused to be interviewed. "I assume that they would have a different picture [than ours]," she says, "but we were not granted access to any of their information, given their refusal to be interviewed."

Doesn't this mean, I wonder, that results of hotel-industry studies will only reflect their researchers' interests? To professor Esbenshade I bring up the "objectivity" question. "What do you say," I ask, "to those conservatives who believe universities are dominated by leftists? Aren't they likely to see your students' report on San Diego's hotel housekeepers as nothing more than bleeding-heart liberalism? Whatever happened to the quest of sociologists in the past for a 'value free' science?"

Esbenshade replies that sociologists today have become more realistic about pure objectivity. "They recognize that all research comes with certain perspectives or theories about how the world operates," she says. "And many sociologists, myself included, are concerned about the underprivileged. That doesn't mean we can't be objective about the facts. It is incumbent on the researcher to present all the relevant information.

"In my discipline," Esbenshade continues, "there has been a whole history of industrial sociologists who tried to help business use workers more efficiently. And on SDSU's campus, the departments of recreation, parks, and tourism, and hospitality and tourism management, do a lot of studies that benefit the tourism industry. So here there is certainly a mix of perspectives on society. The business department, for instance, is huge."

The perspective of the students I spoke with, Micah Mitrosky and Marilisa Navarro, includes the conviction that the Manchester Grand Hyatt should share the wealth with the workers who keep it going. New picket lines appeared outside the Manchester Grand Hyatt in December. But they're not likely to make a difference. For their part, Mitrosky, Navarro, and their student colleagues can only repeat how Doug Manchester takes advantage of public land and taxpayer funds to line his own pockets. And the students can keep bringing up those luxury beds that so nicely comfort his customers' backs. ■

The Magnitude of **Betrayal**

Re "Two Divided by Two" (Feature Story, December 21) by John Corvus.

I must say this article resonated with me. Allow me to comment on it from another perspective. When I was three years old, my father left my mother. He delivered the news to her as soon as my mother had given birth to my baby brother. Can you imagine the scene?

My father would give assorted reasons over the years as to why he had left. Basically, it boiled down to some lame excuse about Mother not being very good in bed. It was a very avant-garde attitude well in advance of the social upheavals of the '60s. Like Mr. Corvus, my father placed his pleasure firmly before principle.

It was absolutely astonishing. He would give up a fine woman, two fine children, position in the community, and his economic life for some strumpet! I am 56 years of age. I am still amazed by the depth of his betraval some five decades on. Like Mr. Corvus, my father abandoned his family in order to pursue his own feral lusts.

The impact on my mother, my brother, and me would be beyond calculation. This happened in the early 1950s in Chicago. At that time and in that place, you did not get divorced! The country still accepted the quaint notion that marriage was forever, and if your marriage was not happy, you stuck it out for the children. The social shame was so great my mother picked us up and moved us to what was then a retirement tidewater in south Florida, effectively cutting my brother and me off from our heritage. We did not suffer, but the opportunity cost was great. What might have been?

I have never blamed my mother. She did what she felt she had to do to put her life back together. She bought a home, became a teacher, and raised my brother and myself. She never remarried. She was a courageous woman. Unfortunately, the magnitude of my father's betrayal took its slow and terrible toll. At the end of the day, I came to realize my father, in spite of it all, had been the great love of her life. She never recovered. Never. My brother and I were deeply affected. I have come to a state of acceptance, but the scars remain.







Heymatt:

How can you really tell that a bird is a male or a female?

— Kay, the net

How can we really, *really* tell? Do I detect suspicion? Exasperation? Has someone been trying to trick you with this question? The first thing we did was send the research elves outside to flip some pigeons upside down and record what they find. That should keep them out of my hair long enough to come up with a real, *real* answer for you. I'm sure you won't be suspicious of me. Everybody knows that Amalgamated Alice L.L.C. offers the best information money can buy. Come to think of it, maybe that's why the *Reader* is free.

You might rightly be suspicious of any simple answer to this question. Don't know whether you're talking about hummingbirds or eagles, but a *real* answer depends on the species you're talking about. Some are easy. You can tell by plumage: the male is flashy, the female dull brown (ducks, common house sparrows and finches, blackbirds, peacocks). Or the male is flashier only during mating season (some herons and egrets). Or consider more obscure color variations (male yellow-breasted chats develop a black mouth lining at the beginning of the breeding season, which fades to match the female's mouth color by summer).

How about behaviors. Males of many species are much louder in breeding season (male mockingbirds sing at night, most male songbirds have a unique song in spring). If you spy two birds doing it, well, the female's on the bottom. One exception is swifts, which sometimes mate in midair. The ornithological version of the Mile High Club.

But say it's not mating season. And your parakeet just sits around doing nothing, saying nothing, and looking pretty much like all the other parakeets. How do you really, really tell if you've got a boy or a girl? Ahh, here come the elves — very grubby — definite resemblance to pooped-on statues. Maybe they can shed some light. According to the elf report, pigeons (and all other birds) only have one rear-end opening that serves multipurposes. When birds do it, they match opening to opening. (Ornithologists call it the "cloacal kiss," but we can ignore that.) So it looks as if our final answer — to be really sure — you'll have to cut open the bird and poke around to locate testes or ovaries. The only weird exception is male ostriches and their cousins, some ducks, and a couple of other oddballs, which have rudimentary penises just inside their cloacal openings. A throwback to some distant reptilian ancestor, say the birdwatchers.

Pee's and Os

We're still soliciting any stories you have about using urine as first aid. Apparently people believe it will cure stingray and jellyfish stings and athlete's foot. JoeM. from Encinitas adds another sea creature to the list.

[While diving in the Philippines] I felt an excruciating pain in my foot. Thinking I was stung by something and on the verge of death, I managed to swim back to shore in a panic. I told my Filipino friends what happened...[and] they told me I stepped on a sea urchin, and I should pee on my foot. After being assured I wasn't going to die, I let them know I wasn't going to pee on my foot. Later, when I went to the doctor, I told her about the "peeing on the foot" remedy. She said urchins' spines are very sharp and brittle so you can't pull them out, but you can help slowly dissolve them over time by applying spirits of ammonia to the affected area, hence peeing on it was actually helpful and not a joke. I applied ammonia to my foot for a month until the pain finally subsided. I have not checked to see the soundness of this medical advice when I got back to the States....

We'll save you a trip. Our own Dr. Doctor sez the ammonia and pee-on-it ideas are pretty much useless. A exotic form of international misinformation. Ammonia (and pee) might neutralize any venom from the sting but won't "dissolve" an embedded stinger. If you can't remove it, your body will eventually absorb it. Spontaneous recovery from an urchin sting usually takes about a month. Infection is your biggest risk. And if pee on an urchin or stingray sting is of no value, pee or ammonia on a jellyfish sting is counterproductive. It stimulates the release of even more stinging agents from the adhered tentacles. So pee isn't quite as valuable as we seem to think.

A different doctor, Doctor Larry, swats me with his diploma for calling all athlete's foot fungi *Tinea pedis. Tinea* is the critter's full name. The *pedis* part means it's living on your foot. It's *T. capitis* in your scalp, *T. unguium* under your toenails, and *T. cruris* if you've got jock itch. There are many more. Call Larry for a complete list.



Glass, stained in various shades of smoky watercolor blue — indigo, teal, cornflower — covers nearly all of the church's side and back walls. Here and there, slashes of red and orange catch the

light, like fish darting amid a stand of waving, undersea kelp. The ghostly outline of St. Mark can be detected above the entrance, but depiction does not seem to be the point here it's mood that matters, a mellow, almost muted

feeling.
"This is a special day for us as a congregation," said Pastor Martha Wingfield. "It's when we celebrate United Methodist Women Sunday." She called the 2007 UMW officers for St. Mark's into the Sanctuary and introduced them. "Longtime church member and annual conference UMW president" Debbie Haustedt read the UMW mission statement, saying that it "shall be a community for women whose purpose is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ." Then the new officers pledged to "be a creative, supportive fellowship," to "renewed discipleship...

through the global ministries of the church," to use their gifts, and to avail themselves of training. Wingfield then prayed over them: "Gracious and loving God...help them always to remember that You are there...and that they only need to stop a moment and wait for You to renew their strength."

A sizable handbell choir — their instruments ranging from tiny to large enough to be played by mallet - performed the Introit. Then, while two servers lit the 12 candles on the altar, the choir, its tone high and gossamer, led the opening hymn: "We are called to act with justice/ We are called to love tenderly...hatred and blindness will be no more...

During the call to worship, Wingfield began, "We are ordinary people," and the congregation responded, "Called by God to do wonderful and extraordinary things." When the children were called forward before they left for Sunday school, a woman explained to them that "in the Bible, it tells us that Jesus said it is our responsibility to help other people. United Methodist Women does just that. Do you remember the tree in the narthex at Christmastime? The one we put the socks on? The United Methodist Women knew it was going to be cold and that the homeless people would need socks.... They send money to different parts of the world.... They make quilts for people who are sick.... They see a need and they do something about it, just like Jesus asked

More handbells, a reading from Psalms, and another hymn for the call to prayer. Wingfield prayed, Gracious and loving God...make us mindful that everything we have is a gift.... Challenge us to reconsider our priorities...always placing You and our faith at the center of our lives. Help us to become more focused on loving and caring for our families and our neighbors.... Fill us with the compassion of your son Jesus.... May we see Christ in the faces of strangers. Give us hearts that yield to the circumstances of those in need...that it all may be a symbol of our love for You."

Acknowledgment of failures in this regard entered into the prayer of confession: "O God, we

confess that we have been busy, busy, busy at worship, and we love studying about You.... We just want to do what's right.... We confess that we bicker

and fight among ourselves when we could be doing more to help the world. Today, we give ourselves to You one more time.... We ask forgiveness and ask that You guide us to make this world beautiful for all your beloved children." Then Wingfield said to the congregation, "In the name of Christ, you are forgiven." And the congregation answered, "In the name of Christ, you

are forgiven. Amen." Service came to the fore again in the hymn "Jesu, Jesu": Jesu, Jesu/ Fill us with your love/ Show us how to serve/ The neighbors we have from You.... Neighbors are rich and poor/Neighbors are black and white/ Neighbors are near and far

Debbie Haustedt preached the sermon, which outlined the

founding of the United Methodist Women in 1869: "Fifty-one years before women had the right to vote, these determined women, without clout, without political representation, without financial means of their own, agreed to the sacrificial discipline of wearing last year's fashions instead of new garments, and they pledged to set aside, every week, two cents and a prayer.... United Methodist Women is now a worldwide movement, one of the largest women's organizations in the world."

"Societal barriers are commonplace," she noted, but "you are God's...and you can know God and experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ...and living as a whole person only makes you want it more for others. That is why we work to eliminate sex trafficking and all forms of child labor."

What happens when we die?

"We join in wholeness in the life of God," said Wingfield.



The cold fact of age — ten years now — has taken the spring out of our Scottish terrier Nellie's step. "She doesn't even jump up on the bed anymore," lamented Patrick, even though he's been shooing her off the quilt for years. The family vet said it was arthritis and suggested I look into canine massage. "Canine massage? Was he kidding?' asked Patrick.

No, he was not. Ann Yerevanian, a licensed RN and a graduate of the Lang Institute for Canine Massage, Healing runs Hands Canine Massage (619-980-5405; www.healinghands caninemassage.com). "Just like people," she said, "dogs get sore, aching muscles and tightness. It can be caused by structural imbalance — if the balance between the dog's front and back end or left and right side is off. If a dog's hind legs are too high for the front legs, you'll have much more weight shifted toward the front, and you could have neck and shoulder issues. Hip dysplasia can cause painful hips, leading to limping. Then the dog will use its good legs to compensate, and since they take more weight, they'll get sore. Then the tightness can travel along the spinal muscles, just as it does with us. If we limp or hop on one leg, first the hip will start to hurt, then the waist, and before

your mid-back. 'Dogs can be born with structural imbalances," continued Yerevanian, "or they may be the result of surgery. For example, after bad trauma or injury, a broken leg sometimes cannot be reset exactly the way it was

you know it, the pain will be up in

Sometimes, dogs can benefit from massage after soft-tissue injuries. And sometimes, they're just getting old, debilitated, and arthritic. Yerevanian stressed that she leaves the formal diagnostic work to the vet, "but what I can do is use my hands to feel for tight muscles. I do a lot of work based on traditional Chinese veterinary medicine. I feel for deficiencies [soft indented areas] or excesses [a harder nodule

that's tender to the touch] to facilitate the flow of Chi [energy]. I put the dog through passive range of motion, and I put the neck and limbs through extension and flexion and rotation to find where I meet resistance. I watch the dog walk and trot; the

gait can tell me if there's a problem. And Iwatch them sit and see if they consistently sit to one side or the other. I also rely on owner history." Nellie's abandonment of the bed is a prime example.

She prefers owners to be present during massage sessions, but says that occasionally, that makes things trickier. "Some dogs are like children — more manipulative when their owners are around. Sometimes, the owners don't let the dog relax - they want to pet the dog, maybe get the dog a little bit stimulated. In that case, it's better for the "I do a lot of work based on traditional Chinese veterinary medicine."

owner to leave the room, so that there's calmness.'

The massage room is decorated with couches and rugs and curtains, so that it looks more like a home than an office. "I like to use scented candles and play music to make it peaceful. And I do use some essential oils; I put them on the dog topically." (Frankincense is a favorite.) "I look for positive and negative responses. If the dog gets up, moves away, shows its teeth, growls, or gives me the whale-eye, I stop and try a different technique. The whale-eye is when they're looking straight ahead but move their eyes to look at you. It's usually a warning. Positives include yawning, licking the lips, soft eyes, and ears going back or falling down.

"If you have an older dog with a degenerative joint disease, I will work with the muscles in the problem area. The muscles have a great deal to

do with the alignment of the bones. In an arthritic area, the muscles clamp down to support that area. My job is to find the area and work out the spasms in the muscles. After the muscle has been massaged and softened, I perform an active release — that's opposition stretching, and

it helps keep the muscle from respasming. The goal is to keep the dog moving normally and without pain; we want our dogs to be able to run and jump and do the things they love to do."

And the goal can be even more than that; there's a holistic element to Yerevanian's brand of therapeutic massage. "You get better oxygenation. You have release of built-up toxins, and massage can stimulate the immune system." Further, said Yerevanian, massage can get at behavioral maladies as well as physical ones. "Massage helps improve socialization skills. I work with dogs that have behavior issues due to anxieties, insecurities, and fears. I've had dogs come in that were adopted from shelters and were very shy and scared of people. Maybe they had

abuse or neglect in their backgrounds. Often, the owner is the only person who can touch or handle the dog. What I do is slowly help the dogs realize that humans are good. I start out by lying on the floor next to the dog. Eventually, I scratch them under the chest and give them treats. Over time, I start to work on massaging. After six visits, one dog was running to me in the office, and now, everybody can pet her."

Massage sessions cost around \$35 to \$60 each, depending on session length. "I try to keep it reasonable. I want to see as many dogs benefit as possible. I work with Dr. Keith Weingardt at the Animal Healing Center in Bay Park.



Think about it. The hospitals weren't so strict back then. Accidents happened. I was switched."


I tried another tactic. "Jane, if there was a computer composite that blended Mom and Dad's faces together, it would look just like you."



I Was a Bad Sailor

wasn't always in trouble or on drugs when I was in the Navy. But I did report to the boat with two black eyes, a busted lip, and mangled nose.

My new chief took a look at me when I arrived and said, "You're going to be a handful, aren't you?" His name was Chief Jacques, and he was a stout, broad man with a New England accent thick as clam chowder.

I protested and tried to explain, but explanations fall short when you really look as if you've been in a big bustup. And I had.

The first seven months I was in the Navy I'd been in boot camp, submarine school, and navigation electronics school. This was spread out over the fall and winter of 1995 and 1996.

When all the other young recruits in sub school had gone on leave for the holidays, I stayed behind in Groton, Connecticut. The command left a skeleton crew of students around the school to stand watch at different buildings and organize little work parties to keep the base running. School was closed, so there was only me and a few other guys who sat around in the TV lounge of the barracks and watched music videos. We'd take a cab through the snow to get coffee and watch movies at the local mall, while everyone else was home with their families and girlfriends, opening presents and eating Christmas dinner.

We had to stay around base on our duty days, which

was every couple of days. On your duty day you stood a watch. Standing a watch meant sitting at a desk at the front door to whatever building you were guarding and waiting for nobody to come in, because everyone on the whole base was gone. There were procedures for what to do if a visiting admiral showed up or if someone without authorization came in, but during the weeks before and after Christmas there wasn't a soul on that base except us guys on duty. So we scribbled in notebooks, wrote letters, drank coffee, all the things you're not supposed to do on a formal watch. Mostly we counted down the time until our relief arrived, so he could sit there and count down the time until his relief came.

One thing I did was keep an extra log book at the desk. Not the official log book of the watch. That was a boring damn thing. The official log book was a blank notebook with a green hardcover. The first person to start a new log had to neatly write along the front cover, "Deck Log Building 381 United States Navy Submarine School

When Al finished his tea he disappeared again around the warehouse building. A minute later he came back and handed me his tea mug, filled with thick, amber brown, sweet dates.



New London Connecticut" and, inside the boring pages, especially during the down time, we'd write something like "0900: Building is secure. No phone calls. No visitors."

On the front covers of the separate log books I kept, I drew pictures, usually something terribly un-military. I was good at drawing pin-up girls, girls like the kind you'd see painted on the side of old WWII bombers. Inside I'd write what I had done that week, who I had met, what I had seen.

"Man, there is this gorgeous girl who works at Starbucks in the mall. She looks young, a couple years younger than me, maybe she's just out of high school. But she has a soft light-tan face and three earrings in each ear. You can see her earrings when she tucks her chestnut hair back. And she has a

nice round body under her green uniform apron. But I can't ask her out. I don't even puccino, and she gives it to me and I can't say anything. I just turn around and leave so I

know her, except the name on her tag, 'Amber.' I just go in and buy a big damn cap-

don't seem like I'm uncool. Last time I went there I hung around and looked at stuff on the shelf like I wasn't just waiting to talk to her. Other people came in and she got busy and then I was standing there looking at coffee mugs and little chocolates and things, like I really had to make up my mind as to whether to buy something or not. Pretty soon I'd been there for 15 minutes, debating on buying something to not seem like a creep or just go up and ask her out. She's a local, so I doubt she'd go out with a







ment of the main sub school building. Pipes in the basement were freezing and bursting, and me and about a dozen other guys had to go up and push the water out the door. Right when we'd get all the water out the door or into a drain, another pipe would burst and shoot icy water through the room. It was a real flood, up to our ankles in water cold enough to freeze if it stopped moving.

Up to that point I'd considered staying on the East Coast and joining up with a sub that would be deployed to European countries and home-based in Connecticut. I hadn't been doing too well in school. I treated it pretty much the way I had high school, just doing enough to get by. The better you did in school, the higher priority you got when you chose a sub. Everyone



wanted a San Diego boat or a Hawaii boat.

Man, right then, with frigid water soaking my socks and boots and my wet hands frozen around a broom handle, I decided to bust my ass in school so I could get to San Diego. Heat waves in Chicago, the "Blizzard of '96" in Connecticut; to hell with that shit.

When I got back to the barracks, I got every guy's classroom notes who had gone through the same schools as I had and I studied them. I wasn't a total lump though; I still went out and had fun. One night, when the roads were too icy for buses and cabs to get into the base, me and some friends bundled up in every piece of clothing we had. We wrapped towels around our heads and put two pairs of gloves on and three pairs of socks and every bit of long underwear and all our sweaters and jackets on, and we ran almost a mile to the other side of the base where the movie theater was playing Hackers, and for our long frozen jog we were rewarded with Angelina Jolie's plump lips, her sassy haircut, and bad attitude.

Even with the gloves and long underwear and sweaters and jogging, my hands were still frozen stiff when we ran back to the barracks after the movie. The other guys sat in the TV lounge and talked about Angelina's body and face and compared it to Gwen Stefani's, when No Doubt's video "Just a Girl" came on, and I went to my room and spread out my notes.

At the end of navigation electronics school I was fourth in my class and there were two openings for subs in San Diego, the USS *La Jolla* and the USS *Salt Lake City*. The guy

Second in the class was a black kid from Tennessee who wanted nothing but to be stationed in Pearl Harbor, and he took a boat in Hawaii. There was a California kid who was third in the class. Those were the last two openings in San Diego, and I couldn't have been more relieved.

I had stayed behind on Christmas break, saving up all my leave, because I wanted a good couple of weeks at home before I had to go to a boat. I wanted to steel myself to being the lowliest scrub by hanging with my dad and my friends and then reporting to the *Salt Lake City* refreshed and scrubbed free of the nasty mud and snow of Connecticut.

I spent two weeks in my hometown, and on the night before I left to report to my boat, I'd gotten into a fight with a drunk and he'd opened my face up, left me bruised and split from the top of the nose to my chin.

The next day I disembarked a plane from San Francisco to the salty smell of the ocean and a warm breeze in San Diego.

"How the hell do you say that name?" the kid asked.

"It's 'All uh very," I said slowly. We were in the sun on the rounded rubber top of the submarine USS Salt Lake City SSN 716.

"Yeah, the new nav ET's here," the slender sailor said into a black phone. "Name's All-uhvery. Yeah. O-L-I-V-I-E-R-I, All-uh-very." He hung the receiver up on an electronic box. "Guess what?" he said. "Your name's Ollie now. Nobody's going to be able to pronounce that thing the way it is."

His name was Matt Turner. Through coincidence, he was on topside watch again when I was banished from the island nation of Singapore, and I was on watch when he was dragged down below decks when he was drunk and raving on the pier in Abu Dhabi.

I say I was banished from Singapore, but that's not exactly the truth. I was politely asked by a local magistrate to leave Singapore and never come back. It's not as if they have pictures of me up on their post office walls. It was just a broken bottle at the bottom of a pool.

A small bit of glass in a pool filter cost me 120 days' restriction onboard the boat and 976 Singapore dollars,

There were two swimming pools on the entire island of Singapore. One of them was at a New Zealand army barracks, where I was staying with some of the other crew. We were a night painting crew; we worked the graveyard shift dabbing globs of seafoam green on dilapidated sections of the boat. Because of the odd hours, we bunked at the New Zealand barracks.

It was a nice barracks. It had a big TV lounge, a small snack stand by the pool that served fried-rice dishes, and the swimming pool. The pool I had to pay to have drained, cleaned, and refilled.

We were given a night off because we'd done a good job painting, and me and the guys were doing it up. We were a little groggy from having worked at night for weeks and we should've been catching up on sleep, but we started out with beer at a bar on base. When the bar was closing we hit a liquor store, and I was feeling sophisticated so I bought a bottle of wine. Other guys got vodka and mixers. Rum and Coke was popular too.

We got to the barracks after hours, and all the New Zealanders were gone. Nobody lived on that part of the base, only visitors. So we set to getting our swim trunks on and fired up a movie in the lounge. We were getting good and sauced, and I don't know who came up with the idea. The stupid idea. It was probably me.

We started pitching stuff into the pool and diving down for it. Because it was night and the only light was through the sliding-glass door to the lounge by the pool, we couldn't see most of what we tossed in. A lot

of Singapore coins went in, and we never found them.

We'd yell, "Sea Hunt!" before diving in, and pretty soon I'd polished off the wine and pitched the bottle in. We dove down and nabbed it quite a few times. It didn't break right away. Then one time I jumped in, skimmed the floor of the pool, and came up with nothing. Some of the guys were yelling at me to come in. It was late and they were tired and a Muppet movie was on. I skimmed the bottom again. My ears hurt. They'd been stuffed all week with Styrofoam plugs while I ran sanders and grinders along the bulkheads we were prepping for paint.

We'd pulled into Singapore from Hawaii. It's a long haul, and the pressure in a boat changes a lot when it's diving and surfacing. And I was diving and surfacing in that pool and digging into my ears. Flakes of blood were coming out when I'd get to the surface and clear my ears. I'd pick at my ears and get a breath to go under again.



I never found it. In my drunken mind I told myself I'd dive again after the Muppets were done taking Manhattan. Maybe my ears would be clear by then.

I fell asleep in a recliner in front of the TV and later bumbled my way up to my room to pass out. I was woken by the paint crew chief at the door,

saying, "Ollie. Ollie, get up. The New Zealanders want to talk with you."

In the bright sun out by the pool, I could see the destruction we'd caused. There were beer cans all over.

A trash can overflowed beneath a sign that read No Drinking by the Pool.

With the hot fumes of booze in my mouth and nose and chunks of dried blood in my ears, I stood, taking a reaming by a pudgy blond New Zealand sergeant. She was ranting about how irresponsible I was, and all I could focus on was her mustache and the hurt of being caught in a royal fuckup, and hungover

A pool cleaner had come that day. There was supposed to be a race held there, but it was canceled because of the glass in the filter.

I wasn't cuffed, but the Singapore police were called. After I packed my clothes in my seabag, I was escorted back to the boat, past Matt Turner standing topside watch, and below decks. In the wardroom, my executive officer and captain negotiated with the police for my release.

When we pulled into Singapore, we were told of an American kid who'd been caught a few years earlier spray-painting black graffiti on cars. The punishment meted out to him was caning. It was picked up by American newspapers and became a pretty big deal back in the States. I remembered seeing his story on the national news when I was in high school.

Singapore is the cleanest place you'll ever see. Anywhere you go in the city there is someone cleaning. Open a door and someone wipes off your fingerprints. Take a leak and after you flush, a man in a blue janitor's uniform scrubs the urinal down with a brush. There are designated smoking areas in the city. Smoking outside of that area is punishable by a fine of up to 1000 Singapore dollars. Getting caught with chewing gum is punishable by the same amount. There was a rumor circulated among the guys onboard. They told of a British girl who, a few years prior to our arrival, had been caught with a bag of weed and hanged by the police in the city square.

being interrogated by the Singapore police chief, but I couldn't think of anything except his black hair, like Spock from *Star Trek*, and his perfect English except for a stutter.

"S-S-Singapore is a very pro-pro-proper n-n-nation. We have strict penalties for d-ddisobedience."


My captain and executive officer did all the talking. I nodded and only said, "Yes, sir," because I know when to keep my mouth shut, but also because I didn't want the smell of my breath to offend the Asian policeman.

"We will not try you in court. But you will be billed for the d-d-draining and c-c-cleaning of the pool. And Singapore k-k-kindly asks you to leave and never come back, please."

The boat had to pull out that night. We were not allowed to dock in Singapore, but we could finish the scheduled repairs at an anchorage in the harbor. A small crew, with me at the quartermaster plot, undocked the boat, motored it half a nautical mile away from the pier, and anchored it. When the rest of the crew arrived, we were in the harbor and the CO was radioing supply chains on land to arrange for a ferry service to bring the rest of the men to and from the boat for the remainder of the nine days we would be in Singapore.

At captain's mast I was given restriction to the boat for the rest of our deployment, 120 days. During the proceedings, I stood in my formal whites uniform that I had dug out of storage, but I still smelled of booze and I needed a shave. We'd pulled the boat away from the pier before loading on potable

water, so all sinks and showers had been secured; they were all shut off and taped up so nobody could use them. The captain held a radio message printout of my bill, 976 Singapore dollars and five Singapore cents. The message also held a personal note from the commander of naval operations, which told of his displeasure with the USS Salt Lake City, its captain, and me.

Singapore, despite having a rainy, tropical climate, has very little natural water reserves. Water has to be shipped in from neighboring countries at a premium. The swimming pool couldn't be filled for a week, and the commander of naval operations of the Western Pacific Fleet, the admiral who'd written the personal message radioed to my CO, had a son who was favored to win the swim meet postponed because of my broken wine bottle.

The captain didn't read the message to

me, but he let me know that his superiors were very, very pissed, and he reminded me that "shit rolls downhill."


"I know. I know," he said. "Is Doc onboard?"

about myself until I was signed into a fiveyear contract with the Navy. And by then it was already too late. I made it one month shy of four years before they kicked me out.



to be a quartermaster, but they were going to keep me the five years anyhow. So when I got out of the Navy, instead of electricity and computers, I'd know how to navigate a submarine. Not a lot of call for that sort of thing in the civilian world, but that's the way it goes.







San Luís Río Colorado appears in the shimmering early light. He is driving fast — he always drives fast. Far away, Yuma, Arizona, suggests itself through the haze. The Mexican checkpoint is outside town. Bored and aggressive Mexican Immigration and Federal Judicial Police officers wave cars over and inspect papers. They deny passage randomly, confiscate valuable-looking goods, exact "tolls" from gringos and border Mexicans who lack the papers or the conviction to persuade the officers that they may proceed. My father

It flips once, twice. Later, rumors suggest it rolled six times. The wheel breaks off in his hands. The windshield

Americans close their doors, turn off their lights, and drive back to Yuma.

Too late to do any good, I enter the picture.

Hugo's sister Margo picks me up on her way to Tijuana. A family friend has called me and told me the news. Margo's car is crammed with silent people as we ride into Tijuana and rise up to Independencia, shoulders digging into each other as the car hits the ruts and half-buried boulders in the road.

My brothers are gathered in the dirt street outside the family home. Dogs behind the fence think we're

having a party. They think the fun's about to begin. They dance on their back legs, eagerly watching us in the street.

They have my father's money and wallet. The doctor has turned them over to somebody, I don't know who, and they have ended up here in front of the family house. My eldest brother hands me the cash. It's floppy. Wet, it feels like felt.

"It must have rained," he says. "Do you think it rained? Everything's all wet."

Hugo looks at me. He says nothing. I know why it's wet. I say, "I guess they had an early-morning shower."

Everybody nods. Hugo gives me the wallet. Inside, driver's license, green card, social security card, notes, slips of paper, useless cards in various shades of blue and yellow. In his picture, my father looks small and old. He has a pouch under his chin. You can see the curve of his skull under the diminishing front rank of his hair.

Nobody knows how to grieve. We stand apart from each other with a strange military precision, two feet between each man. We shuffle. We grin; the old man's dead. We shake our heads, sigh. We laugh. Nobody can fit the fact into the day.







papers, bowling certificates, sheets with numbers on them, military records, a letter from the president of Mexico. Silverfish and roaches come forth from my father's records, where they have lived safely, eating his past.







of my father's death, she is living in a house without heat, without plumbing in the kitchen, with broken plumbing in the bathroom, and without a stove or oven. She cooks on a hot plate.

Hugo shuffles through his pictures. The car looks red as blood. It looks, at turns, vast and minuscule. I look at the crooked seats and see my own ghosts and memories, my own hundreds of miles sitting *right*

I can't get my eyes off the roof of the car. It's bent down, all glass gone. Hugo is right. There's black and white paint smashed into the passenger door.

We send the photographs to the insurance company, and we contact the American consulate for help in investigating the accident. The insurer returns the photos and refuses to pay us a settlement, suggesting the pictures could have been taken after my father died from his stroke. Besides, they tell us, there's no proof that it's even his car.

We are again denied the \$50,000 settlement.

The consul contacts me a few days later. After a full investigation into the death of my father, the facts seem to be that there can be no investigation of the death of my father. In the months subsequent to his death, the entire police force of San Luís Río Colorado apparently has retired. No officers can be found who were on active duty at the time of the accident, and since the ones who were on duty have retired and left San Luís to enjoy their leisure time, there is no one to talk to. The case is closed. Official cause of death: stroke.

In a final act of desperation, I write to the chief of police of the town. Hugo, when he hears about it, says, "Hey. You'd better not go to San Luís. Ever." He thinks it's kind of funny that I'd take on the meanest cops on the border.

"All I want," I tell him, "is an answer."

"Good luck."

But an answer comes. The chief calls me on the phone. In response to my inquiry, he says, he has only one thing to say. And I should remember this

forget it and move on with your life. It is better for all of us," he says, "if there was no accident. Am I

clear? There was no accident."

"Yes, sir," I say. "You are extremely, perfectly

clear." "Good," he says. Then, "Good," again. He hangs up the phone so quietly there isn't even a click.

Within a month of my final conversation with the police, I receive an envelope in the mail. It is from the head office of the chief of municipal police of San Luís Río Colorado, Sonora. The information is printed on the envelope with various official swirls

I find instead a bill on

flimsy paper. The bill is requesting the immediate payment of \$1200, in American currency. This sum will cover, in full, the damages my father caused to city property on the date of January 10. 



"If you had to gut it, then that isn't restoration. Restoration is keeping what's there, repairing the parts that are damaged, and adding new parts that are made of the same thing or look the same for things that are just beyond repair. It doesn't have anything to do with gutting."

On Saturday, January 20, Powell will give a lecture regarding the preservation of

In California, most bungalows were built between 1900 and 1930. The majority of those were built between 1908 and the mid-1920s, at which point they began to lose popularity to Spanish-revival styles.

The good thing about bungalows and early-20th-century houses, in general, is they did have most of the stuff that we consider modern, like indoor plumbing and central heat," explains Powell, who has written six books (with photos by Linda Svendsen) about bungalow restoration. "It's not like you're trying to put a modern functioning kitchen in a house that was built in 1783. Especially in the bathrooms — [except for] low-flow toilets, we're pretty much using the same plumbing [technology].'

"The black mastic stuff, the adhesive, wasn't hard to get off of the tiles, but it was hard to get out of the grout. The kitchen, except for the addition of new appliances, had not really been touched. Mostly that one was about cleaning up the nicotine.

The other bungalow Powell remembers had belonged to a woman in her 90s who sold it to Powell prior to moving in with her son. The house had a small neighborhood grocery store built into the front and a basement for storing products and supplies. "She and her husband had been operating it from around 1952 [when they purchased the home] until 1978, when her husband died. They closed the store, but a lot of the store stuff was still in there. She was a pack rat."

When Powell first visited the home, it was so cluttered that she had to climb over piles of junk and refuse in order to get past the front door. Receipts dating back to the '50s were found.

But there was a positive side to the hoarding: "Even though they ripped stuff out of the house, they didn't throw it away."

The kitchen cabinets had been replaced with "ugly plywood things," but Powell found all of the original cupboards and drawers. along with their hardware, in the basement. By adding an extra bathroom and restoring the cabinets, floors, and countertops, Powell managed to make the bungalow look like an updated version of its debut in 1926.

Powell insists that new appliances should match the existing kitchen for a timeless appeal. "One of the phrases I hate is when a designer says, 'We wanted to mix the old with the contemporary.' It's, like, 'No, you really don't want to do that'....



A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND I BY JERRY SCHAD

he linear. V-shaped gash of Hauser Canvon slices across one of the really remote, southern parts of San Diego County, Many years ago, travelers could descend into the canyon by car on a dirt road and reach a Cleveland National Forest campground. Nowadays, the canyon is visited only by hikers and probably more often by undocumented migrants trying to slip north undetected (but often with Border Patrol agents on their heels). You may feel safer on this particular trek if you're part of a larger group of hikers.

The pleasant stroll down oak- and sycamore-lined Hauser and Cottonwood creeks will be your reward for putting up with a long, somewhat uneventful approach and return on the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT). You start at the entrance

to Lake Morena County Park, just west of the little village of Lake Morena, where the PCT crosses pavement on its way from the Laguna Mountains down toward the border near Campo. Note that this is not a trip for mountain bikers, since mechanical devices are prohibited on the PCT.

The PCT rises on the chaparral-smothered slope south of Lake Morena, offering a wide vista

of the broad, shallow lake. Stay on the trail as best you can, taking care to follow the path marked by PCT posts and avoiding side paths. After many wide turns, various wiggles, and mostly gradual ups and downs, the trail makes a decided pitch downward, losing some 900 feet of elevation as it zigzags down Hauser Canyon's steep north slope.

At 4.3 miles from the start, the trail intersects the old Hauser Canyon dirt road. Leave the PCT at this point and follow that old road west, down-canyon. At 5.8 miles, the waters of Cottonwood Creek tumble in from the north. The flow depends largely upon water releases at Morena Dam, about two miles upstream. A small waterfall and pool, sculpted into the bedrock, are just above the

Below the confluence, the hiking gets seriously difficult as you pick your way through a tangle of riparian vegetation and possibly deal with an increased stream flow. You'll pass the oak-shaded site of the long-defunct Hauser Creek Campground at 6.3 miles. Nearby are the remains of a concrete dam. Finally,


at 6.7 miles, you'll arrive at the Marine Memorial — a monument dedicated to the nine Marine Corps firefighters who perished at this spot during a 1943 wildfire. If you've been able to survive the trek thus far, then expect the effort to be somewhat greater on the return, as you retrace your steps in the mostly uphill direction.

Publishers Weekly: Although Leonard Woolf (1880-1969) was a seminal figure in the Bloomsbury set, he is known today primarily as the devoted caregiver of his wife, Virginia. That his life and career encompassed significant contributions to the literary, political, and cultural events of his times will be evident to readers of this exemplary biography, the first to do justice to a complex man empowered by his intellect and the friends

he made at Cambridge but professionally hobbled by British anti-Semitism and his decision to put aside his aspirations in deference to his wife's crushing needs and his belief in her genius.

"How did you decide to pursue a biography of Leonard

"I'd already done Vita Sackville-West, Edith Sitwell, and Rebecca West, all of whom knew the Woolfs. I had read all of Virginia Woolf's letters and diaries and so on, and I just began to feel. 'What about Leonard, then?'

"There was a very necessary new wave of feminism in the 1970s, without which none of us would be quite where we are today. But a by-product of that time was a kind of knee-jerk downgrading of all men, especially if they were husbands. It seemed to me that a lot of wonderful women had had their due and there were some wonderful men, for God's sake!

"I knew nothing about him, really, except that it was always 'Virginia and Leonard' or 'Leonard and Virginia.' Some people thought he was a saint and some people thought that he was not only the oppressor of genius, but maybe the conniver in the death of genius - especially North American feminists.

"Luckily he had a huge personal archive in Sussex University here. He kept nearly everything, but everybody culls their own archives, and I found that there is almost nothing there about the really bad things that had happened in his own fam-

ily. I had to find out about those somewhere else – from his old nieces, for example – things like the fact that two of his brothers committed suicide, a sister-inlaw committed suicide, a sister made an attempt. These were all after his wife's death. It somehow puts Virginia's suicide in perspective.'

"What explains the almost vitriolic attitude those North American feminists had toward Leonard?'

forget her racism, her anti-Semitism, her complete lack of understanding of the non-intellectual non-upper classes. The working woman was not of great interest to her.

"It seems to me she has been sanctified as a beautiful object, which has sort of taken off like a rosy cloud from the actual Virginia who is completely fascinating and wonderful and a genius and beautiful and clever. but not really altogether a suitable subject for an icon."

I speculate to Ms. Glendinning that I've always thought that many of those persons who have turned Virginia Woolf into an icon would have been summarily dismissed by her had they ever met.

'That's what I think. She published a series of essays under the title, The Common Reader, but I don't think she ever envisaged quite so many common readers, or quite such common common readers. She wouldn't

have had the time of day for some of her common readers.

"Leonard Woolf and Lvtton Strachev seem an unlikely pair of friends, given their different temperaments. What do you think drew them to one another?"

"Lytton Strachey was homosexually inclined, always, and became floridly so at Cambridge as a student. Leonard was enthralled to Lytton. He was very funny and very clever. In one or two letters Lytton deplores the fact that Leonard doesn't follow his proclivities. I think for Lytton, Leonard was, if you like, his straight man - his point of reference. They were very good for each other.

"They were best friends, but once Leonard married Virginia, it was Virginia and Lytton that became the close friends. They were much more like each other. They were gossipy and malicious and illusive. They both went in for a particular kind of witty malice that wasn't really Leonard's kind of thing at all."

'The relationship between Leonard and Vita Sackville-West seems, understandably, a bit strained at times.

"Vita? Well, in one way, it was all aboveboard and understood that Vita and Virginia had this special relationship. Because of Virginia's mental vulnerability, both husbands monitored it. I think, if anything, Leonard was irritated at having to spend so much time with the Nicolsons. But I don't think he ever quite knew the slightly ribald and randy idiom of the intimacy of Vita and Virginia. It's quite extraordinary, really. I don't know if he knew that Vita and Virginia had a physical love affair. And I think when he read all of Virginia's letters to Vita and Vita's letters to Virginia after she had died, it must have been slightly more than he had reckoned with."

'When Lady Ottoline Morrell had those lovely weekends

at Garsington, did Leonard accompany Virginia?"

"Hardly ever. It wasn't really

the sort of thing that he liked. He was austere in some ways. He didn't like high society. I think it was partly the outsider feeling. He would never have admitted that being a Jew made any difference, but it did.

"He'd been bullied at school, and he made what he called his carapace around him - a sort of protective shell, so that nothing mattered. He didn't even admit to himself that it made any difference that he was a Jew, but actually it did."

"The anti-Semitism voiced by many of the Bloomsbury group is quite jarring from today's perspective. Was their view representative of the general feeling at the time?"

"I think they were less inhibited about saying it. They prided themselves on saying everything - talking about sex and semen and whatever they wanted

to talk about. That was part of their rebellion against Victorian stuffiness. So, they talked about Jews as well.

"In the general middleand upper-middle classes, and even in the working class in England before the war, there was a kind of unthinking, casual, but unattractive way of talking about Jewish people. It's rather like in Ireland; people from Dublin make jokes about people from County Kerry. Or people in England making jokes about the Welsh. It wasn't thought about as lethal, it was a sort of casual snobbishness about the outsider."

ginia had florid ways of expressing her anguish, and he had private physical ways of expressing his. The trembling hand was inherited, so it wasn't entirely stress and anguish, but it always got worse when he was nervous. The eczema was a real scourge

to him - terrible bleeding and itching, and that always got worse – either after Virginia's illness or when he heard about what was happening in Nazi Germany in the 1930s. It was his way of expressing distress because he couldn't allow himself any other wav.

"Why, given the fact that the Woolfs published Freud and that several of the Stracheys worked with him, did no one think of having Virginia analyzed?"

"Well, I think two things. Even now, I don't think that people that have quite violent psychotic episodes, as Virginia often did, are quite suitable for analysis. It's more for neurotics than for psychotics. Also, because so many people they knew had iumped into this wonderful new thing, and they knew them very well, with all their tiresomeness and eccentricities, and even inadequacies, they just knew them too well. They wouldn't have sent a dog to any of them. It's as if your strange uncle was an expert in something; he's the last person you'd go to.

"Virginia, of course, never read Freud at all until 1939, a couple of years before her death. Leonard always had a very sound appreciation of Freud. He wrote an early review of The Psychopathology of Everyday Life, in which he said, 'He's more a poet than a practitioner.' Many people would say that now, of course."

"It is so tragic to read that Leonard said, later in life, that he had made no impact on the world. To what extent is that accurate?"

"He worked nonstop for the prevention of war and for anti-imperialism. The number of committees, the number of pressure groups, and the number of hours he put in! I think that what he felt, at the end of his life, was that people were still as barbaric. After the empire was broken down or was cancelled, the countries broke down into civil war or

into increased barbarism.

"I think what he was really saying is that human nature doesn't change. We are somehow unredeemable and we don't learn from history. Human nature doesn't get any better, and man's treatment of man doesn't get any better."

I confess to Ms. Glendinning that I find it a curious paradox that he maintained, throughout his entire life, that 'nothing mattered,' and yet he still worked so hard for social reform.

"I think it's very touching that when a much younger woman who was his great friend and support in his last years challenged him about that thing nothing matters – he just turned to her and said, "Everything matters." In a way they mean the same thing.

"What accounts for the fact that people are still fascinated by Bloomsbury?"

"I think a lot of it is due to their accessibility. This particu"Everybody kept those letters."

lar group of people wrote letters all of the time. They were very articulate indeed. Everybody kept those letters. They sort of thought it was for posterity. The one time, in fact, that Leonard destroyed one of Lytton's letters because it disgusted him so much, Lytton was really, really

"They spent a lot of their old age collecting-up, finding, and suppressing all of these bunches of yellowing old letters. They were self-conscious about their own posterity. And then, of course, there were Virginia's letters and diaries, which were the core of the whole thing, which she had kept and which Leonard sold to dealers in America.

Then there became the American market, which was fed

by more and more stuff, which the dealers went over and bought. I say they were rather like migrating birds returning to their feeding grounds every year. In fact, at one point the market was almost glutted, and they had to hang onto some of the stuff.

'Then, of course, there's the industry of academia. There are all these research students and MA students who have to have something to 'work on,' and there was all of this wonderful stuff to work on. It fed a great flood of books and articles, which, in turn, added to the archive, so that the whole thing grows exponentially. Now, all that is there for another generation to work on. But, if Leonard had destroyed all of Virginia's letters, it wouldn't have happened." – Jerry Miller

The promoter says video documentation of a fight could legally impact a venue if a lawsuit arises from such a conflict.

The Bayside venue on the Embarcadero increased from hosting 8 pop-music shows

in 2005 to 23 shows in 2006. Last year, Vieias Entertainment brought majorname artists such as the Black Eyed Peas, Radiohead, and Angels & Airwayes to the stage behind the convention

center. Last week, the San Diego Port District, which controls the site, responded to noise complaints from Coronado residents; this year, Bayside is allowed no more than 11 pop concerts. Fines will be levied for excessive noise violations. Viejas Entertainment president Steve Redfearn says he will bring quieter artists to Bayside.

"We were prepared for the news," says Redfearn, meaning that in 2007 the ipayOne Center will host many Viejas Entertainment headliners, including Justin Timberlake, Tool, Christina Aguilera, the Killers, and John Mayer.

"I think that situation was mismanaged," says one promoter about the Bayside decibel levels. "All they had to do was splay the speakers so they pointed down. Instead, they were pointed out into the ozone. I think they could fix the problem so the people in Coronado wouldn't be bothered."

Redfearn disagrees: "It is way more complicated than that. Water and sound have trouble mixing."

One insider says that because the Bayside venue is now less viable as a concert venue, Redfearn may try to

talk the Viejas tribe into building an outdoor amphitheater on Viejasowned property. Redfearn says there is such a possibility and adds that a new Vieiasowned venue would not be as big as the 50,000-capacity Coors but be similar in size to Bayside, which holds 5000 with seats or 10,000 open seating. Such a venue would not necessarily be on property currently owned by Viejas.





Pro Bono San Diego U2 front man Bono recently disavowed the band's current

greatest hits compilation, U218 Singles, as "a joke, really, because we've never been much of a singles band." However, the set has been a boon for local video archivists Reelin' in the Years Productions. The U2 album's current single, "Window in the Skies," uses vintage footage of music legends synched to the song. Reelin' in the Years

provided 34 clips for the project and served as consultants with the video's producers.

Located in El Cajon, Reelin' in the Years is considered the largest musicvideo archive. They've provided clips for numerous DVD compilations, including sets by the Jam, Led Zeppelin, and Elvis Costello.

The company's footage can be seen in the film Vanilla Sky and at the annual Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame ceremonies; this is the first time they have worked on a current chart contender.

"Our mouths just dropped when we saw the final footage," says Reelin' in

the Years president David Peck. "The last thing to affect me like this during a screening was Johnny Cash's incredible video for 'Hurt,' but this isn't sad like that

Though they didn't work directly with U2, the company provided more than 24 hours of potential footage for the video, including material from Zappa, Beck, and Black Sabbath.

"Initially, we were asked to contribute in the research phase of the production," Peck remarks. "But that soon turned into major involvement.... We had to obtain permission from every artist, or their estates, that was included. That's over 100 in less than a month. Some artists didn't want to do it, but most were thrilled to be a part of it....

This is the fourth track released by U2 with a San Diego connection. In 1994, a live version of "Until the End of the World" (recorded during a 1992 stop at then-Jack Murphy Stadium)

was released on the Alternative NRG compilation. The band also worked at Signature Sound Studios in 1997, taping vocals for the single "Last Night on Earth" and mixing a duet with Sinéad O'Connor, "I'm Not Your Baby."







2. The Boswell Sisters, Shout Sister Shout! "Be-





I keep waiting for rockabilly to finally grind itself into the ground and go away, but it lives on, if only by grafting onto other genres. One of the better of the hybrid rockabilly bands comes from deep in the heart of corporate country. But Legendary Shack Shakers owe little to Nashville; if anything, they are the antithesis of everything that country music stands for. And while the Shack Shakers may have been a purist rockabilly band at one time, today they embrace many sounds: metal, blues, hillbilly, punk, and a jacked-up version of klezmer.

Klezmer is Yiddish music. It originated during Biblical times. It stands out from rock because rather than lazy distorted power chords, Klezmer is abrupt and precise and is based on a harmonic minor scale. It suits the Shakers' front man, J.D. Wilkes, who has been compared to Iggy Pop. Wilkes is a compelling, shirtless, angry dude with a strange dark voice (it grabs your attention in the way of skidding tires on pavement) who can also play hell out of blues harmonica. He has been called the ambassador to Southern culture by writers too young to actually know better - unless they were momentarily enthralled by the germ of artistic madness that seems to be the

common denominator of truer Southern ambassadors past like Tennessee Williams or Truman Capote.

Much of the rock press loved the Shakers' first two CDs. Pandelirium, their latest, is no less noteworthy. "Is that the Lord's face in the wood of a door?" sings Wilkes. "No, there's no such thing. Is there a toad in the stone two million years old? No, there's no such thing." Allow the Shack Shakers a 10



for expenditure of energy and another 10 for creativity, and if you find their lyrics to be a step below shock nonsense, keep in mind that this could be the one show from 2007 that you will actually remember.

Follow the career of San Francisco indie band Birdmonster to see how to become the Next Big Thing:

1) Self-release an EP. Birdmonster did in 2004. It didn't get much attention at first, but it gave the band experience that came in handy later.

2) Pay Magnet magazine \$500 to put a song on a sampler CD. Birdmonster did so in 2005 with one of the EP songs and soon started receiving offers from record companies. The band members (singer Peter Arcuni, drummer Zach Winter, and former San Diegans guitarist David Klein and bassist Justin Tenuto) wanted more creative control than

they were offered, so they rebuffed the offers and selfreleased their debut album No Midnight last year.

3) Capture the attention of an influential Internet radio outlet. The award-winning site Bagelradio practically adopted the band as its own. The attention helped Birdmonster gain inroads at broadcast radio stations.

4) Score gigs opening for highly regarded bands. Birdmonster won battle-of-the-bands contest in which the prize was a spot on a bill with Death Cab for Cutie. They also got

a big boost when they opened for the muchblogged Clap Your Hands Sav Yeah.

5) Get noticed by music bloggers. In Birdmonster's case, one of the first was Music for Robots. Tipped off by members of Clap Your Hands Say Yeah, the blog proceeded to rave about Birdmonster, which led to some heavy buzz.

play energetic shows. Birdmonster does both, but especially the latter.







Where Smoking Is Good

Will a North County Southern-style barbecue created by a Bronx-born Italian American become the next Jack in the Box? Maybe not — but how about the next Rubio's or Sammy's Woodfired Pizza? That's the kind of growth that chef Joey Maggiore is hoping for with his new mini-chain, Joey's Smokin' B-B-Q, and he may just succeed. Let's face it — south of Oakland, there's not a lot of longsmoked barbecue in California, and when the craving hits, nothing else will do. There are already three Joey's locations — the original in Carlsbad, a newbie in Carmel Valley, and a booming franchise in Idaho, the land that "Q" forgot (until Joey's remembered it). Basketball players Luke and Chris Walton have bought into the concept, with plans to open an outpost in Manhattan Beach in two months; other branches are in the works for Orange County and Irvine.

What makes Southern-style barbecue different from backyard steaks grilled on the Weber? First, it's cooked "low and slow" over smoldering hardwood (or wood chips) in an enclosed smoker, rather than grilled over a hot fire fueled by briquettes, mesquite branches, or gas. Often, Southerners rub barbecue meats with an aromatic spice mixture before cooking; they may also baste during cooking with a strongly seasoned liquid (as in your typical Texas "mop and sop" — the mop is the baste, the sop is the thicker sauce applied just at serving, so the sugars won't blacken in the heat of the pit). Meats emerge from a smoker imbued with the flavor of whatever wood has been used for fuel. Inexpensive cuts (like brisket and tri-tip) that can be tough and gristly when cooked on high heat turn tender when slow-cooked in smoke. After all the work and patience, you've got yourself a mouthful of flavor.

Some say smoked barbecue was developed mainly by African Americans in the South, as a way to make the most of tougher, bonier pork cuts that "the big house" passed along. Another story credits the invention to German immigrants who settled around San Antonio and expanded their old-country sausage-smoking traditions to include hunks of beef. But there were earlier traditions of Native Americans slow-smoking meat and fish all along the Pacific Coast and in the Caribbean Islands, - who knows who really started it? (Even in high-country Nepal, the best Sherpani cook I encountered hung the week's yak meat over her

juniper-fueled fireplace, resulting in the tenderest, smokiest vak I ever tasted.)

A few years ago, Joey Maggiore, then owner of Joey's California Bistro in Coronado, realized that he, too, had a craving for genuine barbecue. Hop-

ing to spend more time with his growing family, he sold his bistro to a corporation. A week's trip to Memphis, a few days in Texas, a consultation with a retired Mem-

phis BBQ chef, and Joey's Smokin' B-B-Q was hatched.

The sauce is at least as important as the smoke soon, he discovered that authentic Deep South flavors hold little appeal for So-Cal palates. Most locals rejected the vinegary Carolina-style potion and the smoldering Texas-style sauce. The two survivors called "suh-weet" and "mild-spicy" - are offered in chafing dishes at a condiment table opposite the order counter, near the iced tea and soft-drink dispensers. The "suh-weet," resembling Memphis-style pulled-pork sauce, is thin, bright red, light, and tomatoey, with a brown-sugar flavor. The "mildspicy" is heavier and sharper, with tomatoes,

molasses, and a hint of vinegar, much like bottled sauces from the supermarket. If you like a spicier sauce, table condiments include Tabasco and good Louisiana-made

Red Rooster hot sauce, which adds flavor as well

Joey also experimented with the buns. First he tried brioche-dough buns from St. Tropez Bakery, the closest local equivalent to Memphis's fluffy pulled-pork sandwich buns. He loved them, but patrons asked for firmer, dryer, hamburger-type buns, so he switched to shiny-topped potato-flour buns. Some diners wanted packaged supermarket-style white bread (the staple of soul-food BBQs), but Joe nixed that idea — he doesn't like the stuff.

Even the equipment had to be adapted to California customs, since many zoning ordinances either ban full-size pit barbecues (because the smoke is considered a pollutant) or charge extra to license Joey's Smokin' B-B-Q ★★½ (Good to Very Good)



them. Instead, Joey chose smaller, self-contained electric smokers that use hickory (or other hardwood) chips. (With their automatic settings, these machines also require less skill to control than oldfashioned pits, so they produce more uniform, idiot-proof results.) By the time he'd adapted to local laws and tastes, Joey was no longer producing Southern "Q," but So-Cal "Q" — more an homage to Memphis than anything you'd find in Memphis

I went to the chain's newer location in a chillingly soulless mall called Torrey Hills Center. Joey's tiny operation stood out from the surrounding sterility because its decor looks warm, and faintly Old West. There are a few booths and high, round,

wooden tables inside (facing a mirrored wall to make the place look twice its size) and plenty of tables outside. The decor features about a zillion kitschy rural barnvard animals in numerous sculptural media, including wrought-iron paper-towel dispensers topped with rooster silhouettes. Those paper towels in place of napkins are a clear signal: "Go ahead and get messy." You order at the counter, and they bring the food to your table when it's ready (not instantly — this isn't McD's).

So how did Joey's measure up? In general, I found the meats less intensely smoky than a true pit barbecue can make them and the sauces less powerful and complex than those I've tasted in the South — but you'll still find some darned good eating here. My favorite of the meats was the pulled pork, which offers reasonably credible Memphis-style flavor and tender-chewy texture. It's hard to eat the pulled-pork sandwich because the meat's piled so high on a slightly tough bun that it calls for knife and fork. But order the entrée plate, get a little cup of the "suh-weet' sauce, mix it with some Red Rooster and pour it on, then top the heap with coleslaw - and you might find yourself saying "y'all."

Given the upscale neighborhoods he's targeting, Joey couldn't buy just any beef ribs. He went with precious Kobe, most of it from Snake River Farms in Idaho. (No, Snake River's cows don't drink beer, nor do they get beer massages. They're just a prime breed, raised with care and rich feed.) Kobe longhorn beef ribs are monstersized, apparently cut from Paul Bunyan's Babe, the Blue Ox. They're tender and gloriously fatty, with great beefy flavor.

Baby back ribs come in three

different costumes: sweet ribs are glazed before grilling with the suh-weet sauce. Wet ribs are glazed with the mild-spicy sauce. Both are so tender, you don't even need teeth. Dry-rubbed ribs — Joey's version of ribs he'd tasted in Memphis - have no glaze but are sprinkled with Joey's own spice rub after smoking (and before grilling). They seemed tougher than the others. One of the secrets I learned from a master Southern pitsman in Oakland is that meats develop deeper, cooked-in spice flavors when you massage in the spice rub before smoking — that way, the fat in the ribs is imbued with the spice blend and "bastes" the meat with those flavors as it renders. (I also like a lot more garlic in the rub — after hours in the smoker, it mellows out, tasting more sweet than "garlicky.")

The lazy-smoked BBQ chicken plates offer a choice of sizes and colors. We found the white meat moist and the dark meat spectacularly succulent. The glazing sauce is the 'suh-weet.'

House-made hot links are well seasoned in the Louisiana manner and boast a good, coarse texture, but they're extremely salty. I'd take them home to toss into red beans 'n' rice and make the beans with less salt to compensate. I wasn't impressed with the too-dry beef brisket. It's been smoked so long (14 hours) that all the fat has rendered out. This is why Texas barbecues use a mopping sauce on brisket, not just for flavor but to seal in moisture. One lunch hour, I tried a Kobe beefburger. It was huge and looked good, but the default here is to cook it well done and then some, which I consider a waste of great meat. (And with this, too, I'd prefer a softer, fluffier bun.)

Joey's offers a wide choice of

side dishes. "Mama's downright addictive BBQ beans" (per the menu) comes with most entrées, along with coleslaw and cornbread. The beans are pretty standard BBO beans sweetened with molasses, pleasant enough but not remotely addictive. The coleslaw is in the KFC mode (the only food on KFC's menu that I consider edible), creamy but clean and crisp and not a sugarbomb. Cornbread means corn muffins. One visit they were about normal, but the next time the batter was unevenly mixed, leaving the bottom crusts hard and heavy.

The French fries that come with the burgers are standard fast-food fare. The sweet-potato fries would be a healthier and more flavorful alternative. Mac'n'cheese is creamy, gooey, and cheesy — soul food for your inner child. The hush puppies lack the typical Southern onion or scallion bits, but they're light and tasty with crisp surfaces and soft centers, like cornmeal Tater Tots. Potato salad here is bland, mainly just potatoes and mavo - awfully white and utterly non-Southern. We didn't get to try the collards or the corn, nor (new to the menu) the fried pickles. I'd bet on the latter. As for house-made beverages, the lemonade tastes "homemade" and not too sweet, while exiled Southerners will relish the sugarloaded iced tea, made just the way their mouths remember.

For dessert, the requisite sweet-potato pie is returning to the menu in a week or so; alas, it was off at the time I visited. I didn't try the other choices, which include lava cake, cheesecake, pecan pie, and cookies.

Last night, some friends from San Francisco breezed through town and brought us a little "care package" of doggie-bagged ribs and pulled pork from Memphis Minnie's on Haight Street — the smokiest barbecue west of the Pecos. The meats were marvelous, but Joev's did not suffer overmuch in comparison. If you're used to regional Southern barbecue, and you've read some of the food blogs raving about Joey's, adjust your expectations. Every dish here has been carefully formulated to appeal to only one region of the South — and that's sunnin', surfin' Southern California, Yet So-Cal "O" is way better than no "Q" at all, and that's why I'm betting that Joey's will be fruitful and multiply.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Joey Maggiore grew up in a Sicilian restaurant family. Originally from the Bronx, they moved to California when he was young. "My father owns six restaurants," he says, "here and in Phoenix, including two in Carlsbad, Tuscany Tommy V's.

"My first restaurant was Joey's California Bistro in Coronado. I loved the area and the people, but I got bought out by a company out of Phoenix. They offered me good money, and I decided it was the right time. I live in Carlsbad, I'd gotten married and had two kids and another one on the way, and I decided that with these late hours — two in the morning — it was starting to kill me. I said, 'Let me come up with something different.' My wife was happy to hear that.

'After I sold the restaurant in Coronado, we were trying to decide what to do next. 'No one's doing barbecue,' I said, so we went to Memphis, and I fell in love with the food, the way they smoked it. I really didn't know anything about it, and it blew my mind. It was unbelievable, really good, and I said, 'Let's try it!'

"Then we went over by Texas and saw how in the different regions they do different things to the meats. The one I liked in Texas was a chain restaurant called Red Hot and Blue Barbecue. It was a quickserve, with a lot of to-go, kind of like what I'm doing, only a little bigger. I wondered if it was a chain or an individual place, and then I started seeing them on every corner, so I went in and talked with the managers. They said they did really good business, and that's when I decided to do quick-serve style, that it would really work in California. Every restaurant I went to, I wanted to take a little piece of what they did and perfect it.

"The recipes took me about five months of research. I looked at every menu possible - what did Tennessee have, what did Texas have, what did all the little towns have, what they were popular for. So we could have a well-balanced menu, to where if you're from certain areas, we'll have one or two of your local items on the menu. Sweet potato fries, collard greens. We're doing fried pickles now, we're putting in mashed sweet potatoes. I went to my father's steakhouse, Tommy V's, and worked with the executive chef there to come up with a spice blend for the meat. When we finally found one that we liked, I said, 'Oh, my God, what did we put in this?' We had to go back and figure out what we'd put into it. Then I went to a spice company in San Diego that did an exclusive for me, where they would make up the spice blend in big batches so we could use it for franchising.

"We started with three different sauces and we made 'em at first, but if I wasn't there, they'd come out all different.

And if they're not the same every day, that's no good. So I said, 'If we want to be as big as I hope we can be, we can't make 'em at every place. We don't have a big commissary, we're not set up for that yet.' So I teamed up with Girard's, which is a big dressing company, high-quality stuff. They had a barbecue line that they were phasing out, so I bought the rights to it for California. I kind of fell in love with the 'suh-weet' sauce. We tried four different sauces, but people didn't like the mustardvinegar sauce or the real hot spicy sauce. They wanted one that was sweeter.

"For the meat, we use all high-quality natural meats. We wanted to have Kobe beef, because people around here are really getting into it. The Kobe ribs are hard to get. Most restaurants buy them with the chop attached, but because my father owns a steakhouse and buys a lot of Kobe, we were able to work it out with the meat supplier...

"My wife came up with the decor, with all those farm animals. She decorates all the places now, so it'll be pretty much the same at all the locations. It's a lot more homey than the other franchises and chain restaurants in the malls. People can just come in and relax.

"Iust before I opened, I had a guy that came out here for a month from Memphis to help me open the place. He's a real good pitmaster, retired. He used to own restaurants there, and he taught us how to do it. Because I wanted to make sure we kept the real Southern style going. And ever since then we've been going strong. No, I don't want to be the next Jack in the Box, but I'd like to see 15 or 20 branches — or maybe 50 or 60." ■

guess it's those bright blue-and-red Cinzano umbrellas. "Oh, Eď," says Carla. "How European! Let's see if they do lunch.'

I was gonna pop in to Danny's saloon, home of Coronado's famous Slamburger, for a snack. Af-

ter all, it was voted "best burger" for years, right? But, what the heck, we cross the street. Yes, Carla's hauled herself back from that horrible compound leg fracture she had over a year ago to almost normal walking. We stop outside this little place with four streetside tables. A five-foot-high cylindrical

drum that's pasted with menus is set on a stand. Very Paris. The tables are covered in white cloths, with paper on top that you can scribble notes and draw pictures on. Very Paris. Add the umbrellas and you practically want to sing the Marseillaise.

Or is it Mexico City? I check out the menu pole. There's a mix of American and really interesting Mexican stuff. Along with burgers, they've got dishes like rasurado — shaved abalone with serrano hot peppers and "rasurado sauce." Nice. About twenty bucks, though.

Carla glances inside — creamy walls with big poster-type art. "Let's sit out here," she says. "More bistro-ish. Ooh. Nice springy stretch-string seats.'

A pretty girl comes out with menus. Federica. The owner's daughter. Carla and I order a coffee (\$1.75) while we look over the possibilities.

One side of the menu lists some very enticing starters, but they're expensive. Like steamed mussels for \$18.75 and mains like French-style entrecôte and pommes frites, \$18.75. I'm getting worried. Then I see they have sandwiches from \$5.75 to \$9.75 and

all-day breakfasts from \$4.75 to around \$7.75. Whew. And other dishes. The Spaghetti Carbonara is \$8.25, and Spaghetti Alfredo's \$8.75.

Carla has her finger on "Gourmet tacos."

I do a double-take. "Ten-fifty for tacos?"

"Yes, but look what you get: 'Medium-rare grilled beef rib-eye over sautéed green onion and sesame [seeds] covered with green salsa, served on flour tortillas.'

Uh-huh. Me, I've shifted focus to a pear and blue cheese salad with candied walnuts (\$7.75). Or Swiss fondue for two, \$17.75. Nine bucks each.

"Damn," Carla says. "Steak Tartare. Raw. With

I shake my head. It's \$17.25 for one. I ain't that

In the end, Carla gets a bacon cheeseburger (\$7.25 with fries), and I ask for the Mexican dry noodle soup (\$5.25), with grilled chicken strips on top (\$3.25 more).

But here's the funny thing. They're both interesting. My "dry" soup is a bowl of spicy wheat noodles called fideo seco, with, looks like, chorizo

mixed in, and chipotle sauce, and chopped chicken on top. It's tasty, almost Asian, 'specially when you dunk forkfuls into slightly sour Mexican-style cream.

I'm slurping these things up happily, head down, when Carla says, "Ohmygod. You've got to taste this. Look at the size of it. Here.'

I take a bite of her burger. Oh Lordy. J-u-i-cy, way big, pink inside. Yet the flavor isn't naked-meaty, but spicy, garlicky, wonderful.

"This is the best damned bacon burger I've ever had!" Carla says.

"It's a half-pounder, it's organic, and it's filet mignon," says José Guitian, the owner, Federica's dad. "The supplier I found was throwing away the extras from all the organically grown filet mignons he was cutting. I persuaded him to grind them up for me instead. That's how we've got the best hamburger meat available.

Carla's so blown away, she insists on coming all the way back next morning for breakfast. I ask Federica's cousin Yahel for one of their omelets. For \$7.75, you have a choice of ham, bacon, cheese, mushrooms, tomato, or avocado.

"Or," says Yahel, "have it with everything." "Same price?"

Yahel nods.

Wow. So, heck, I do, and it comes out bulging and dee-lish, with a fresh-heated chunk of baguette that's free, after I ask for it. But, actually, Carla gets the more interesting item, a plate of enfrijoladas. Two cheese-stuffed corn tortillas doused in a slurry of black beans, then topped with that slightly sour Mexican cream and queso fresco, crumbled Mexican cheese.

"In Mexico City, where we come from, we don't use fava beans or pinto beans, like in the north," José says. "They're too sweet."

José, who used to run Señor Frog's in Tijuana in its glory days before 9/11, says this restaurant was Federica's idea. "She was only 20. I said, 'It's long hours.' But she really wanted to do it." The whole family runs the place now, including Norma, José's wife, who originally didn't want any part of it.

The most popular item, José says, is the tortilla soup, and then the pear and blue cheese salad. 'We do a lot of dishes from Mexico City. Like the 'Pepito sandwich' [\$11.25]. That's filet mignon slices with refried beans. We even have the 'cornpoop' soup. That's what the Aztecs jokingly called the black mold that grows on corn. Huitlacoche. You'll have to try it next time."

He says it's around \$6.50. Damn. That's the second time I've heard about this dish in six months. First time this side of the border. "We're coming back," I say.

"Yeah, but not to eat a fungal disease," says Carla. "We're back for burgers, babe. Danny's Slamburger's just met its match. They think they can beat organic filet mignon?"

"Fat chance," I say. ■

Wine Online

"What I want to sell people on is the concept of discovering."

hen Brad Harrington started the West Coast Wine Network — a San Diegobased online wine forum that ended up becoming one of the web's premiere wine resources — it was the act of a passionate amateur,

a neophyte in love with wine and eager to discuss it. He wasn't alone in his eagerness. The site, founded in '96, took off: winemakers started visiting, and the industry soon realized the value of a virtual community of serious wine lovers interested in finding and evaluating new products.

But, says Harrington, as the years went by, "I saw people come up and find different places in the industry to work. People saying, 'I'm an accountant, and I don't really like it, and I've got a chance to do something with this winery. What do you guys think?' I saw a lot of people make the jump, and some of them are getting successful now. A couple of guys have their own wineries. I kept looking at them and thinking, 'Geez, I know so many people in the industry, and I know a fair number of buyers. How can I make my passion my job?' "

He didn't want to go down the media route ("It's a tough road"), and he lacked the capital to start a winery. A retail shop looked to be the best use of his connections and talents — in particular, his knowledge of what's new and relatively unheralded. The WCWN was (and is) one source;

frequent visits to Central Coast wine country were another. "Every time I go up to Santa Barbara or Paso Robles," he says, "I always walk away with something new."

And something new is what he wants to of-

fer. "What I want to sell people on is the concept of discovering. Don't just sit there and rely on the same old things. Ninety percent of the joy I've gotten from having this wine obsession comes from finding new things. It's great to sit there with a \$150 bottle of Napa Cabernet that everyone's been

hyping for 20 years. I'm not knocking it; it's good wine. But you didn't discover anything. It's not like you had an insight that hasn't already been made by a million people. But with some of these other things, when you find that gem, you're onto something that 99.9 percent of people don't know about. I think there's a lot of value in that. It's what I like to do." It's one of the reasons wine is able to inspire obsession, or at least devotion — the endless variations of vintage, of provenance, and of varietal.

And so, a little over three years ago, Harrington opened Varietals Wine Merchant on Rosecrans. "Varietals, to me, are what it's all about. There's so much out there that's awesome, and I think it's been fun to watch California develop these grapes. They're getting so much better at it. In the last ten years, we've gotten to watch

Syrah just blossom. To me, it's definitely the number-two grape in the state. I'll put it up against Cab anytime. I've done it and watched Cab guys realize that they just got beat by a wine that cost a third of what theirs cost. I think we're in the beginning to mid-stages of seeing the same thing happen with Grenache, and after that, I think it's going to be Tempranillo." (He carries at least three California versions, in various styles — ranging from quasi-Old World to fruitily New.)

The Tempranillos share a room with (among other things) a number of Cabs from Washington State ("I think they're the perfect cross between California and Bordeaux"), a Napa Valley Malbec (!), a domestic Tannat (!!), high-end domestic Pinot Gris, high-end Italian Sauvignon Blanc, vineyard-specific Champagnes, a fruit-forward Albarino, and a declassified Mersault for under \$30. "Decades ago, the guy put six inches of topsoil on his vineyards, and he got declassified. He can't put 'Mersault' on the label, so he can't get the price. But it's everything a decent-to-good Mersault should be."


That room is one of four that make up the shop's new digs. Harrington began in a 600-square-foot space below street level and without signage. "I was trying to do this on a real budget. When you apply for licensing in the wine industry, you've got to have the lease in place." Things got tight; boxes stacked to the ceiling, reps wondering why they should bother bringing product to such an overstuffed location. Customers got frustrated trying to find the place. So, after he had worked through the licensing morass — everything is in place now but the tasting permit — Harrington moved upstairs to his suite of tidy white cells. "I like the space," he says. "I think it works."

The front room houses Harrington's bargain wines — cherry-picked stuff, most of it under

\$15 — plus a number of rosés. (Here again, he leans toward the domestic, which takes a bit of digging when it comes to rosé.) "I'm going to try to expand this section," he says. "I don't think I can carry just my exact niche wines." But neither is he particularly excited about carrying stuff that can be found at Costco — the shop's too small for that. The second room holds the Cabs and Tempranillos and such, and the fourth may one day be a tasting bar. The third? "That's my real love — all my Rhones, with my Pinots in this corner. These are all the people I know. I've got more Central Coast Pinots and Syrahs than probably anybody in town." Some of his old favorites have been lost to big distributors that don't want to bother with him, but, he says, "There are peo-



ple who will be sure that I get stuff when nobody else is getting it in Southern California."

Often, his most precious gems will sell out quickly through e-mail customers, but for his first weeks in the new shop, he wanted to leave a few on the shelf. "I've got tons of Samsara," the shedista side project from Chad and Mary Melville. He's got the wines from the Melvilles' shedmates as well: Jim Knight's Jelly Roll, and the Piedrasassi from Sashi Moorman and Peter Hunken. "And I've got all the Tensleys," he says, referring to a coveted lineup of seven single-vineyard Santa Barbara Syrahs. (At least, he had them as of this writing.)

"I think my timing might be perfect," says Harrington. "I think the Central Coast is getting very popular. People are starting to understand that these are great wines. Santa Barbara is world class; the wines are as good as they are anywhere on the planet. I'll stake my reputation on it. I know a bunch of winemakers from France who have tasted them and been blown away. It's just a matter of getting everybody to realize it." By year's end, he's hoping to have a tasting license so that the wines can help make the argument for him. Until then, "I just tell people that it's awesome stuff. I get excited about the wines. And people who come in usually come back."

Bubby's Gelato 937 South Coast Highway 101, Lumberyard Shopping Center, Encinitas, 760-436-3563. This tiny storefront does only a few things (sandwiches, gelati, and sorbet), but does them exceedingly well. The "gourmet sandwiches" really do live up to their designation, with intriguing Mediterranean combinations (artichoke hearts, black olives, grilled eggplant, Gorgonzola are among the choice of ingredients) on soft, round Italian bread. (Or you can just get a tuna melt if that's your flavor.) Gelati are about twice as rich as Häagen-Dazs, and feature an ever-changing ar-

ray of bold flavors, e.g., vanilla rosewater and chocolate cinnamon. Open daily 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., closes later on Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — *NW* (10/01)

Fidel's Carlsbad 3003 Carlsbad Boulevard (at Carlsbad Village Drive), Carlsbad, 760-729-0903. It's not upscale modern Mex — no cumin-infused. mango-corn salsa on Fidel's menu but who gives a flyin' fajita when you can order just about any traditional SoCal-Mexican dish and know it's gonna be good? Whether you try the chicken-andrice soup with fresh cilantro and avocado chunks, fluffy chile rellenos, a crab enchilada, carne asada with all the trimmings, or a lonely à la carte chicken burrito, you're going to be a happy camper. Add a reliable margarita or a beer and you're set at this popular North County mainstay. Open seven days a week for lunch and dinner, Inexpensive, -S.M. (12/03)

Firenze 162 South Rancho Santa Fe Road (at Manchester), West Village Center, Encinitas, 760-944-9000. This big beautiful, gracious restaurant (located in the same mall as Harvest Ranch Market, just north of Rancho Santa Fe) offers both a handsome interior and a romantic fire-lit patio. The well-spaced tables are laden with huge portions of accomplished, multiregional Italian cuisine and reasonably priced Italian and California wines (with 1/2-price wines Monday nights). Vegetarians will rejoice in the two dozen meatless selections. Lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday, dinner only on Sunday. High moderate. — N.W. (11/01)

Hill Street Coffee House 524 South Coast Highway 101, Oceanside; Really! Look for the sign: "Organic Restaurant and Espresso Bar" in front of a restored yellow-and-white Victorian house from O'side's past. All their meats, poultry, fish, and veggies are organic and the menu is full of healthy dishes: tofu/spinach breakfast scramble, frittata espinaca ("Greek eggs"), and pain perdu (for us peasants that's French toast) with fresh fruit and syrups. Some vegan items. After 11 a.m., try their Cajun chicken. Open daily, breakfast to dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

I Trulli Trattoria 830 South Coast Highway 101 (between G and H streets), Encinitas, 760-943-6800. An enduring hit in Encinitas (where there's no shortage of Italian restaurants), I Trulli serves modern Italian food with fashionable new ingredients. The menu, subtitled "Nouvelle Italian Cuisine," resembles the somewhat ambitious, generically "northern Italian" bills of fare that you encounter all over Hillcrest and the Gaslamp. (It is, in fact, a sister restaurant to Hillcrest's Arriverderci.) The signifiers of seriousness are the pink peppercorns, goat cheese, sun-dried tomatoes, and light cream sauces that coexist with the more traditional mozzarella-tomato sauce arrays. Best bets are the daily specials, which offer the great-





est chance for fresh ingredients and creativity. Busy, cramped, painfully loud inside. Street patio next to highway is also noisy. Reserve for dinner on weekends or expect an hour's wait. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (11/01)

Johnny Manana's 308 Mission Avenue, Oceanside, 760-721-9999. Pescado Veracruz (fish marinated in lime juice and garlic with rice, beans, and green salad) is good. The roasted chicken is delicious. Go straight to the single-spaced page-long list of daily specials for the most exciting dishes, including spaghetti a cartoccio (baked in parchment paper) and lobster risotto. But save room for dessert, especially if the day's offerings include *torta alla nanna*, a rose-scented nut confection. Try the green salad with vibrant cranberry vinaigrette, the "Bag of Bones" (house-smoked pork ribs), the brick-roasted free-range chicken, and whatever "fruit creation" is on the dessert menu. Busy and noisy; reservations urged for weekend dinners and all summer. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Full bar. Moderate to expensive. — N.W. (6/05)

Red Tracton's 550 Via de la Valle, Del Mar, 858-755-6600. Even though you know you're a half mile from the Pacific Ocean and across the street from the Del Mar Racetrack, one step inside Red Trac-ton's dining room sends you reeling back in time to an upscale, dimly lit, maroonand-gilt restaurant of 1960s Chicago. The only thing missing is the scent of cigars. Food portions are enormous: The lobster sandwich (a touch heavy on the mayo) easily packs a half pound of lobster. Tomiko 87 Encinitas Boulevard (at Best Western, just west of I-5), Encinitas, 760-633-3587. Don't overlook the tansandwich on focaccia bread with a variety of fillings, best served grilled and doori dishes. Numerous selections are available for vegetarians. An all-youdressed with pesto. And you can't lose with mezedakia, a big oval sampler of dolmades (stuffed grape leaves), lokaniko (a delicious Greek sausage), spanakopita (spinach in filo pastry), tomatoes, cucumbers, tzatziki dip, hummus, feta cheese, and olives. But come for the lamb. It's wonderfully flavorful, skewered in the souvlaki entrée (which comes with beans and rice) or as lamb chops. Moussaka (baked eggplant, zuc-chini, and ground beef) goes down well too. Or what's wrong with a simple plate of feta cheese, kalamata olives, and a glass of Greek red? Open daily, 11 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (1/06)

Bistro 221 221 East Grand Avenue Kalmia), Escondido, 760-737-7398. This genteel bistro with comfortable chairs and linen-covered tables inside and a shaded patio on the sidewalk — is especially tasty at lunch, with its sophisticated quesadillas and a classic burger and fries cooked your way. At dinner simple starters shine, including a "blonde" Florida version of gumbo and Maryland crab cakes with minimal filler. The dinner entrées are also the best, including beef tournedos with Gorgonzola and grouper caught just off the Florida shores. A "Louisiana" bread pudding is moister (hence more pleasing) than most of its namesakes. No wheelchair access for restrooms. Free parking behind restaurant. Ordinary wine list. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Friday; dinner Saturday. Lunch moderate; dinner moderate to high. -

La Tapatia 340 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-747-8282. Take a walk on the mild side at this family-owned favorite, in business since the 1930s. You'll find standard Mexican fare in a comfortable dining room or, in good weather, a lovely, arbor-like stone walled patio. The most celebrated dish is the "cheese crisp," a large tostada covered one-third in ground beef, onethird in beef chunks, and one-third in beans, with cheese, avocado puree, and sour cream over all. Many preparations (grilled seafoods, etc.) are healthy, and veggies taste fresh. Seasonings are rather de-tuned, but there's a saltshaker and a lively salsa on the table. Open

The Wayside Cafe 507 South Main Avenue, Fallbrook, 760-723-9633. Locals love meeting and eating in this long low-porched building — partly because it all just feels small-town America. The place used to be Mahrs' Serv ice Station. You can even sit in the old Lube Bay to eat. Count on generous servings, especially the mountain-piles of red-skinned home-fries as a side at breakfast. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/01)

LA JOLLA

Barbarella 2171 Avenida de la Playa, La Jolla Shores, 858-454-7373. This popular restaurant sits nestled in an English garden just blocks from the beach. You can dine amidst the flora at street-side tables, in the enclosed patio, or in the small dining room. Once you're seated, the friendly staff provides fresh-out-of-the-oven sourdough wheat bread to nibble on. The menu changes daily, offering fresh fish, steak, chicken, pastas, soups, and pizzas, all cooked with a twist of imagination that delivers on the flavor. For instance: pizza topped with smoked salmon, crème fraîche, chives, and fried capers. Or delicate Alaskan halibut served over creamed spring onions with a water-cress salad. If a fresh fruit crêpe happens to be on the dessert menu, leap on it! Open for lunch and dinner daily. $-SM^{(4/04)}$

Cafe Japengo The Aventine, 8960 University Center Lane, La Jolla, 858-450-3355. Here Bentleys and Beamers far outnumber Buicks. Inside is contemporary with an Asian flair, complete with kimono stands and bamboo forests. Sushi is the specialty, and it's above average, although the sushi bar chefs aren't very friendly, and the seasoned rice tastes quite salty. The highly prized fatty tuna (*toro*) and flying fish roe tohiko are offered when available. Otherwise, they may be replaced by smelt roe, masago, which may be a minor disappointment. However, the uni (sea urchin roe) is pristine. If you appreciate subtlety, try the eggomelet sushi (tamago), a delightful mixture of eggs, sake, and mirin. Creative party rolls are especially popular here, including the amusing Tootsie Roll — sweet and spicy, crunchy and spongy, with fried soft shell crab topped with grilled shitake mushrooms, avocado, and a sake marinade. Entrées are often a letdown, but diners may be satisfied to make a meal from appetizers like the Char Su Duck Salad with goat cheese, candied pecans, and pomegranate vinaigrette; Duck Wontons with coriander pesto and *ponzu* sauce; and an excellent kimchi martini. No reservations for the sushi bar; arrive early for prompt seating. Lunch weekdays only; sushi bar opens at 5 p.m.; dinner begins at 6 p.m. Very expensive. — B.D. (10/05)

Cliff Hanger Cafe Torrey Pines Gliderport, 2800 Torrey Pines Scenic Drive, La Jolla, 858-452-9858. "You should never leave the ground on an empty stomach," says the sign near the cliff, which is where this café hangs. What is it like to be at the Café at the End of the World? You sit, munch, and watch men becoming birdmen, jumping off the cliff beside you. The view of the Pacific Ocean is spectacular. But, hey, grub's good too. Try the Launch (a breakfast burrito with scrambled eggs, bacon, cheese, onions, bell peppers, and salsa) or the Mile High omelet (bacon, cheese, and bell peppers). Also great and grilled right there: generous half-pound hamburgers. Open daily for breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. - E.B. (1/06)

Daily's Restaurant 8915 Towne Centre Drive, La Jolla, 858-453-1112. The idea is brilliant: Just serve food that's really, really good for your customers. Low fat, low calorie, low sodium. Brainchild of cardiac surgeon Pat O. Daily. So what's the problem? It's the "B" word, Bland, Not that they don't fight heroically to make all the dishes interesting, but lots of items have that lentil-y, bean-y feel. Or naked salad-y. Or steam-up-your nose veg-gie. Among the more interesting choices is the Caiun chicken with black beans and brown rice with cayenne-paprika in the spices. The most popular lunch order, the buffalo burger, has a little gamy aftertaste - but that just proves it is the legendarily lean prairie beast. Nice outside seating in Restaurant Row, except you've gotta resist the smells from the more wicked eateries that aren't on the same crusade. Inex-pensive. Three meals, Monday through Friday; open until 4 p.m. Saturday; closed Sunday. — *E.B.* (1/06)

The Marine Room 2000 Spindrift Drive (off Torrey Pines Road), La Jolla, 858-459-7222. High cuisine, high adventure, high seas - at only moderately high prices. With chef Bernard Guillas as top toque, the Marine Room has become the quintessential great San Diego restaurant. The exhilarating coastal view meets Cal-French-Pacific Rim cuisine that's as exuberantly out-front as the waves whacking the windows. Guillas's oceanic culinary inventiveness with ultra-fresh, exotic ingredients makes every visit a voyage of discovery, and preparations are so elaborate that each listing on his precise menu reads like a whole tasting dinner. Reservations requested; slightly dressy but not stuffy. Easiest route: Make a right from westbound Torrey Pines onto Roseland or Viking and go left on St. Louis, which runs into Spindrift, Wheelchair ramp to the left of front door. Noisy when crowded. Dinner nightly, 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Expensive. — *N.W.* (9/02)

Michele Coulon Pastries 7556-D Fay Avenue (across the street from Vons parking lot), La Jolla, 858-456-5098. The daughter of Don Coulon (retired chef-owner of The Belgian Lion restaurant) presides at this delightful little café/bakery. (Look for it behind the octagonal sandwich shop that fronts its mini-mall.) Every ingredient is fresh and of top quality. Cakes are light, moist, rich, and available as wholes, slices, and even "miniatures," plus you can choose tarts, chocolates, ice creams, and breakfast pastries. Open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Moderate. — N.W. (5/02)

Nine-Ten Restaurant Grande Colonial Hotel, 910 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-964-5400. Chef Jason Knibb's level of craftsmanship shows a culinary sophistication that would be at home in San Francisco or New York. You'll find adventurous, seasonal cuisine emphasizing "market fresh" local produce (much of it organic or sustainably raised), naturally raised meats. and wild seafood. It's not just the food that's fresh - the ideas are, too, and the flavor-matches are flawless. The wine list is superb, and new personnel in the front of the house have brought up the standard of service. Validated valet parking, full bar. Reservations urged. Open daily, three meals. Expensive. — N.W. (10/05)

Sante Ristorante 7811 Herschel Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-1315. The name is Italian for "saint," and the Northern Italian/regional cooking shines here, especially the fish and seafood dishes. Fresh seafood specials are available every night, in addition to those on the menu. Excellent pasta with mushrooms, ravioli with quail, and lamb chops. Separate room for bar; separate private dining room. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner nightly. Enclosed patio for lunch. Not to be missed. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — E.W. (4/99)

Sushi on the Rock 7734 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-1138. This noisy, high-energy spot — a boxy, saloon-like space with a sushi bar in back — draws a lively twenty-something crowd (although older folks will have plenty of company, too). Unlike more traditional sushi bars, there's a vast selection of "rock and rolls" — huge, creative party sushi. And they're fabulous, with sparkling fresh seafood and immensely clever combinations. Try, for instance, the shrimp tempura roll, which wraps fried shrimp, crab shreds, daikon sprouts and Japanese mayo in deep-fried salmon skin — the combo would be just as impressive as an appetizer at a top Cal-French restaurant. The Orange Crush is another sublime invention, fresh and crunchy with veggies and tobiko wrapped in suave salmon. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly, with deep discounts for happy hour specials. Moderate. Second (quieter, but with full bar) location at 1923 Calle Barcelona, ... 1725 Calle Bard artsbad, 760-436-6261. MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Bali Thai Café 407 South Camino del Rio South (dead end, west of Auto Circle and Mission Center Road), San Diego, 619-297-0800. Expect the unexpected! This tiny, unique restaurant splits its menu between three nations with chefs from Indonesia and Thailand and a chef-owner from Suriname, a former Dutch colony (like Indonesia) in South America. The Thai menu is standard, although the $tom\,kha\,koong\,(shrimp\,in\,co$ conut milk soup) is outstandingly authentic (don't eat the stuff at the bottom of the bowl!), while the richly tropical Indonesian dishes are so rare locally that culinary adventurers will want to explore such delights as "seafood delight roll," corn fritters, the soothing soto ayam (the Indonesian version of chicken-noodle comfort soup), Balinese fish filet, and the spicy *sambal goring* (shrimp in chili sauce), among others. Short but smart wine list, beer, sake. Easy evening parking. Heated, roofed patio. Large portions. Reserve for weeknights, no reservations accepted for weekends. Tuesday through Sunday, lunch and dinner, Low moderate. — N.W. (4/06)

Emerald Chinese Seafood Restaurant Pacific Gateway Plaza, 3709 Convoy Street (at Aero Drive), 1st floor, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888. Arguably the best Chinese restaurant in the county, here's where local Asians (of all nations) go for both casual family dinners and special feasts of Hong Kong specialties. When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Viet-namese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gourmet delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations accepted for all meals, including weekend dim sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in madeto-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate, with moderate splurges like live fish and Peking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). Open daily from lunch until midnight or later. - N.W. (9/02)

King's Fish House 825 Camino de la Reina (west of Mission Center Drive), Mission Valley, 619-574-1230. To find King's in the mega-mall, go slightly west of Koo Koo Roo and follow the line of cars to the free valet parking. It's a chain, but it's a classy chain, offering fish and seafoods of a quality that's well above average, including crustaceans from a live tank and a half-dozen varieties of pristine oysters. Generously-sized entrées come with soup or salad (including a Caesar that's above suspicion) and two

hefty side dishes. The vast menu of American-style preparations changes daily to reflect the fresh catch, and includes some rotating regional specialties (e.g., New Orleans, Hawaii, New England). Don't miss the prawn pot-sticker appetizer, if available, and for dessert, the miraculously light bread pudding. The atmosphere is good-timey (with two patios and a barroom as well as a dining room), the service is enthusiastic, and the management will accommodate special requests if you call ahead. Kiddie menu available. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (5/02)

Korea House 4620 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-560-0080, Korea House offers floor seating or a table if you want to barbecue your own food. The menu offers fine "down-home" Korean food, such as traditional mandoo (beef) dumplings, and *yookhwe*, a steak tartare worth risking. Make a meal from enormous appetizers like *gul bosam* (raw oysters, pork, and cabbage leaves). Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. – *M.N.* (9/98)

Nijiya Market 3860 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-3821. If you're not willing to sacrifice quality for convenience when eating fast food, try this Japanese market in Kearny Mesa. Nijiya Market offers prepared box lunches, or bento, that are pretty to look at, appetizing, and a real bargain. I suggest, however, passing by Njijiya's steam trays and heat lamps and going straight to the cool-ers, where you'll find delicious chicken cutlets, fresh sushi, and chilled noodles, as well as dessert delicacies like sweet bread roll filled with sweet bean paste. Inexpensive. — M.N. (8/99)

Pampas Argentine Grill 8690 Aero Drive (at Montgomery Field), Kearny Mesa, 858-278-5971. The Argentine specialties feature grilled grass-fed beef, in-cluding a somewhat Americanized version of the gauchos' great parillada mixta (mixed grill), with a great chorizo but minus any exotic organs. The naturally raised meats are lower fat and lower cholesterol than feed-lot beef but are salted heavily in the kitchen unless you request otherwise. Specify rare or medium-rare, unless you really like brown cardboard. Lighter fare includes free-range chicken and fresh, welltreated seafood. Beef empanadas are a tasty, authentic starter. Potatoes (fries and mashed) are splendid, salads are exuberant. The full bar features Chilean and Argentine beverages with many af-fordable South American wines by the glass. Park in lot at restaurant's front door, not the back-door lot. Lunch (mainly sandwiches) on weekdays. Dinner nightly. Entertainment (harp) Friday through Sunday. Closed Monday. Moderate. — N.W. (4/02)

The Philadelphia Sandwich Co. 3904 Convoy Street (south of Othello), Kearny Mesa, 858-571-0888. This classic luncheonette is a monument to Philly culture, including sports pennants, historic photos, and colorful mummers' costumes. The menu is equally devoted to the city's cuisine, especially its two great cult sandwiches: the hoagie and the cheese steak. The mixed-meat hoagie is way more than a hero — its flavor array is similar to (and just as intense as) a New Orleans muffulletta. As for the cheese steak, it starts with steak strips onions and your choice of cheese, and expands from there. Philly natives may like the simple version with Cheez Whiz, but the luscious "Everything" with provolone is more likely to seduce the innocent. "Philly fries" (with garlic) are the right go-with. The menu also offers Pennsylvania-packaged foods ("Philadelphia Scrapple" to go, Tastykakes, Wise potato chips) to nostalgic émigrés. Lunch to early dinner nightly. Inexpensive. — $N.W.\ (10/04)$

San Tong Palace 4690 Convoy Street (between Engineer and Balboa), Kearny Mesa, 858-571-6837. This unassuming, strip-mall restaurant is easy to overlook but once found, impossible to resist. San Tong's hybrid Korean-Chinese menu draws from these regions' tastiest styles. The Rainbow Salad demonstrates this combination deliciously, and San Tong's dumplings are outstanding. The seafood dumplings are especially remarkable. For the adventurous. I recommend the iellyfish salad, a novel treat for westerners. At San Tong Palace, curious appetites are rewarded well. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (4/99)

Seau's Mission Valley Center mall, 1640 Camino del Rio North (next to Robinsons-May), Mission Valley,

619-291-7328. Footballer Junior Seau contributes more to San Diego than just sacks. His extravagant multivenue sports pub is major league fun — a real-life reincarnation of some 1960s McLuhanite media art show, with 70 video screens (ranging from large-normal to giant HDTV) running sportscasts and a pro-fessional DJ on high, periodically spin-ning cool sounds over muted talking heads. The menu offers mainstream 'something for everyone" choices, including pizza, hefty but so-so burgers, some elementary sushi, all-American entrées, and Seau's family recipe of Samoan teriyaki "plate lunch." Above all, there's pub grub. The chicken wings are pretty good, and you can get all three sauces (Buffalo, BBQ, and Asian) on one order. Perfect hangout for mismatched couples with one sports fan and one fashionista (the latter can head for Nordstrom and Saks discount outlets nearby). On game days, patrons are allowed just one game in the dining room (\$15 minimum), but you can linger from wake-up to closing on the patio or in the bar. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. Tofu House 4646 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-576-6433. This stylish little eatery is proof positive that our city has matured for its specialty ethnic foods. Tofu House is a Korean restaurant serving up specialty tofu dishes. Flavorful, healthy foods. I highly recommend the soontofu soups (beef, pork, seafood, or mushroom) with raw egg drop you drop yourself and a side of tasty fresh kimchi. Deliver yourself from sorrowfully generic foreign food — Tofu House serves vivid ethnic food. Open daily. Inexpensive. — M.N. (2/99)

THE BEACHES

Baleen Paradise Point Resort, 1404 Vacation Road (off Ingraham Street), Mission Bay, 858-490-6364. Take a quick trip to chic Miami at the local branch of Florida's famed new resort restaurant. Whimsical tropical decor features a monkey motif (carved in the chandeliers, peeking from the paintings) and mambos play on the speakers. But the unlisted prices for chilled shellfish may make a monkey of you unless you ask before you buy. The menu features high-quality seafood and land creatures in refined renditions, including gorgeous lobster bisque, salmon with a clever hummus crust, herbed sea bass, and a hunk of free-range veal. Servers are charmers. The wine list is long and rather steep at the bottom end with better values farther up the range. Reservations recommended. Very expensive. — N.W. (12/00)

The Bar-B-Que House 5025 New port Street, Ocean Beach, 619-222-4311. OB's piling in, and for good reason: the chicken and ribs are smoked on an oakwood fire, then charbroiled. Beef, pork, and ham spend eight to ten hours in the smoker. Of course, they have pork ribs. A good-value combo is the Southern-Style sandwich — beef, pork, ham, or chicken with coleslaw inside, along with a sauce that's just right: sweet, tangy, spicy. Most original idea? A BBQ burrito with meat, baked beans, coleslaw, and sauce wrapped in a flour tortilla. Expanded menu includes gyros. Open seven days, breakfast through dinner; till 9:30 p.m. weeknights; 10:30 p.m. weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/04)

Cafe Athena Pacific Mall, 1846 Garnet Avenue (at Lamont), Pacific Beach, 858-274-1140. With a more upscale, eye-catching decor and a longer and more serious menu than most Greek cafés, this is a popular destination, so be sure to reserve for dinner or you'll risk a long wait. The choices include good soups and appetizers (except for a sub-par *taramasalata*), outstanding moussaka, above-average gyros, and interesting, unusual desserts. There's plenty for vegetarians. Rather noisy when crowded. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (3/02)

Cantina Panaderia 966 Felspar Street (at Cass), Pacific Beach, 858-272-8400. This cheerful café instantly became a gathering spot for many PB-ites, including the forsaken population of adults. Chef-owner Isabel Cruz, who calls herself "Food Girl," has imported much of her Mis-

sion Cafe menu of Latin-Asian-sortahealth-food to the beach. A self-confessed "lazy cook," she focuses on wholesomeness rather than authenticity. Breakfast and lunch are the main meals here and include competent eggs. luscious scrambled eggs, huge sand-wiches, and weighty slabs of coconut French toast. Competent Latin-style dishes include tamales with airy masa. Devotees of Southeast Asian cuisines however, may be disappointed by the simplistic stabs in that direction. If your dish is too mild, house sauces (chili oil salsa, chipotle sauce, etc.) are available on request. Beer and wine. Small, free front parking lot; pay lot across the street at west end of the block. Three meals daily; closed 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. In-expensive to low moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

Costa Brava 1653 Garnet Avenue (at Jewel), Pacific Beach, 858-273-1218. Cordial owner-host Javier Gonzalez opened this charming restaurant so that local Spaniards would have a place to gather with an authentic atmosphere of home, and indeed, the "Euro' atmosphere and late hours give a truly Iberian feel. The lively garlic-rich dishes here include a wide array of tasty tapas and, among the entrées, a paella that's made to order (sized to serve two or four; call ahead for larger groups). Patio seating in good weather. Parking lot and wheelchair access via the alley behind the restaurant. Open daily 11 a.m. to midnight, with bargain prices at Sunday brunch. Reservations advised for weekend evenings. Moderate. N.W. (2/02)

The Fishery 5040 Cass Street, Pacific Beach, 858-272-9985. Pacific Shellfish Seafood Company founder Judd Brown got his start as a commercial fisherman. He doesn't fish anymore but he does everything else - supplying product to top-tier restaurants, retailing glistening specimens to hungry shoppers and serving patrons who want to dine in amid the icy-blue walls and gorgeous trophy fish. The Fishery's menu is equally extensive, covering So Cal basics (excellent mahi-mahi burrito), lunchtime standards (sandwiches, fine malt-dredged fish and chips), sushi, and an ambitious lineup Over 400 more restaurant listings at SanDiegoReader.com



of dinnertime entrées, some of them whimsically creative (tortilla-encrusted Mexican black bass). If ambition occasionally outstrips execution, an obsession with freshness helps compensate, and you get the sense that things are getting better all the time. The wine list is relatively inexpensive and carefully selected. Casual atmosphere. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. — A.M. (12/03)

Humphrey's by the Bay 2241 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-224-3577. Free parking when there's no concert, valet parking when there is. Dining room pleasantly quiet. Open daily breakfast through dinner; brunch buffet Sunday. 

The steaks and roast beefs are delicious, as you'd expect, but also enjoy creative appetizers and sides like shaved corn with black truffle and a seared ahi stack. Salt runs freely, and the excellent international wine list runs high. Do reserve; free parking, Open daily, dinner only. Very expensive. — *N.W.* (5/06)

Kabuki Sushi Restaurant 4475 Mission Boulevard (entrance on Garrnet), Pacific Beach, 858-270-1986. This place has a unique system of delivering tempting dishes to you via boats floating along a mini-canal that surrounds the sushi bar. You take food off and pay according to the plate size. The sushi chefs — they can be a show in themselves — have the usual panoply of sushi, sashimi, nigiri. The dragon rolls (crab, shrimp tempura, eel, avocado) and spider roll (soft-shelled crab) are tasty too. It's young and crowded here — is that because you don't have to sweat the menu, just grab what you like off the boat and chew? Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday to Saturday; diner only Sunday; closed Monday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (1/04)

Kaiserhof 2253 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-224-0606. Even on weeknights, crowds fill this restaurant and biergarten, chowing down on hefty, hearty German cooking in a festive atmosphere. Flavors are authentic, but can be monotonous due to the kitchen's reliance on commercial products (especially a heavy-flavored beef base that makes all the sauces taste alike). Good schnitzels, potato pancakes. The excellent apple strudel is the only dessert made in-house. Reservations advised, especially for patio seating. Full bar. Lunch Friday through Sunday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Moderate. — N.W. (6/02)

Kono's 704 Garnet Avenue (on the boardwalk), Pacific Beach, 858-483-1669. This inside-outside café is your prototypical California surfer hangout. It's cream and green with maroon canvas window canopies, redpainted make-believe shutters, and

three surfboards sprouting through the roof. On weekends, lines of tourists come looking for their California fix. But Kono's is known among locals, too, for generous breakfasts. Check out their PBS: Pancakes, Bacon and Scrambled eggs. Or the breakfast sandwich with eggs, bacon, cheese, and tomato on a toasted English muffin. Or the CB Burger (chicken breast, green chili, and pica sauce). Best time: foggy mornings. Chow down on their patio on the pier while you enjoy a birds-eye view of surfers appearing out of the mists below. Breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/00)

Mardi Gras Cafe 3185 Midway Drive (near Rosecrans and East Street, in mini-mall with a 7-11, across the street from Godfather Pizza), Loma Portal, 619-223-5501. The Creole cooking at this café/grocery, to eat in, take out, or have catered for your next party, is sound and tasty, if deliberately underseasoned (just add salt and hot sauce to taste). You can also buy the real and rare ingredients from the freezer, deli case, and grocery shelves, including Cajun tasso (spiced ham), boudin blanc (rice sausage), and crawfish sausage when it's in season. Daily brunch through early dinner. No alcohol, everything available for takeout. Inexpensive. — N.W. (2/01)

Red Sails 2614 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-223-3030. One of the city's oldest eateries has been renovated to look like it always has, but fresher. The dining rooms resemble those on a river paddleboat or a small, rakish cruise ship, while the bayside patio is a funky waterside pleasure, beset by pigeons. The menu runs to simple seafood and steaks (wet-aged USDA Choice), but quality is uneven. Tasty starters include briny littleneck clams on the half-shell, an interesting clam chowder, and a classy house salad (but ask for vinegar and oil on the side to dress it). The coconut shrimp entrée is a good, guilty pleasure, but the fin-fish and fried entrées taste like supermarket frozen food. For the starch accompaniment, baked potato is the most flavorful option. Full bar, strong cocktails, weak wine list. Kiddie menu available. Daily three meals until 11 p.m. Low moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

Sapporo Japanese Restaurant 5049 Newport Avenue (by the pier), Ocean Beach, 619-222-6686. It's small,

but Sapporo has big deals, particularly the lunch specials that usually give you a miso soup, salad, and a combo such as chicken teriyaki and California rolls and white rice — all presented like a piece of performance art. Other specials include *yaki soba* (stir-fried sautéed chicken, vegetables, and noodles) and *champon* noodle soup (*udon* noodles, scallops, shrimp, vegetables), and the value-packed Chicken Bowl—a big plate of sliced chicken, broccoli, other vegetables, and a swag of rice. Dinner daily, lunch daily except Monday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/01)

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

El Comal 2822 Imperial Avenue, Grant Hill, 619-239-7101. (Other location at 534 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-3811.) No border compromises here — just great home-cooking from Michoacan, Guerrero, Jalisco, and Oaxaca, prepared by Luz Herrera Ibarra, a biology teacher from Acapulco. Try the huarache (cactus slices with carne asada, frijoles, cheese, and onions) or the mulita carne adobada (pork, melted cheese, and guacamole inside two tortillas) and have a glass of nuez (a refreshing walnut drink). Chula Vista location has parrillada meats. Breakfast through dinner until 8:30 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Leftv's Chicago Pizzeria 3448 30th Street (at Myrtle), North Park, 619-295-1720. An eight-pound pizza? That's what Lefty claims his "king of all pizzas" weighs at his often-crowded little corner pizzeria. Truth is, you can't help but be drawn, especially at night, to the little ribbon of lights framing the sidewalk canopy with its tables and benches. Lefty is determined to bring "the real Chicago" to San Diego. So of course we're talking deep-dish pizzas, as well as some thin and crispy. But the ultimate is his "stuffed" pizza, a 14-inch, eight-pound monster that needs one hour's "make and bake" time. They also do Chicago hot dogs, char burgers, beautiful spicy fries, juicy Italian beef au jus sandwiches, and a decent "Lefty's carbonara" (spaghetti, eggs, bacon, Parmesan, and cream). Open lunch and dinner six days, closed Mondays. — E.B. (5/05)

Old World Restaurant 3930 30th Street, North Park, 619-238-0568. This is a delight for anyone who loves Northern European food. Their "Great Grilled Grueben" — homemade corned beef on rye with Swiss cheese, sauerkraut, Thousand Island dressing, and mustard is, as they say, "gemütlich." Also, try the sausage platter: grilled bratwurst, kielbasa, sauerkraut, potato salad, spicy mustard, and rye bread. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

Red Sea Restaurant 4717 Univer-

sity Avenue (at Euclid), City Heights, 619-285-9722. You'll find richly seasoned (and potentially very spicy) Ethiopian cuisine, served communally on a tray lined with a porous pancake injera, which looks like an edible dish towel and serves as both an edible spoon and an edible tablecloth. (Use pieces of it to scoop up morsels in your right hand.) The meat combination platter here isn't nearly as exciting as several of the specialties. The kitfo (spicy beef tartare) is very good, the *gored-gored* (meat cubes in spicy butter) is excellent; both are cooked (or not cooked) to your order, and seasoned to your specifica-tions (if you say "hot," expect fire). Vegetables are fine, too; the yellow split peas, especially, sing with flavor. Restrooms not wheelchair-accessible. Vegetarian friendly. Can be noisy on weekend evenings. Open daily. Very inexpensive.

Sister Pee Wee's Soul Food 2971-1/2 Imperial Avenue, Grant Hill, 619-236-0470. One of the oldest, best soul food cafes in the county, but get there early (it closes at 6 p.m.). Sister Pee Wee says her lunch and dinner menu depends on what she feels like cooking that day — you might find big pork ribs with mashed red-skin potatoes, black-eyed peas, collard greens and two-inch-thick corn bread, or Southern-fried chicken, or catfish fillet with all the trimmings. Sister's special is chitlins and catfish. (Call ahead about the availability of chitlins.) Breakfast includes eggs, bacon, ham, sausages, and hominy grits. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/01)

Tazablanca 3946 Illinois (north of University, two blocks east of 30th Street), North Park, 619-294-8292. This warm-colored, lively café offers the homey, tropical food of Cuba and some pan-Latin appetizers cooked with Cuban styling. The fried calamari is light, the *papa rellena* (stuffed potato) is

lively, the lechón (marinated roast pork) is moist and flavorful, and the vibrant chicken fricassee with capers is irresistible. All entrées come with a salad, and the tequila-lime dressing is especially fresh tasting. Reservations for groups of six or more. Park behind the restaurant (via Grimm and the alley) or in Lumberjacks's lot. Live band plays Thursday through Saturday evenings and is quieter than the ambient music when there's no band. Patio seating in fair weather. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Full bar including mojitos, Mexican beers, mainstream wines, and Latin soft drinks. Moderate. — N.W. (1/06)

Uncle Joe's Pizzeria 4591 El Cajon Boulevard, Talmadge, 619-584-2535. The owner's a retired Navy medic, one of the first women to serve in the Middle East combat zone. She's named sandwiches for career stops, like "The Recruit Training Center, Orlando, Florida" (chicken breast, bacon, avocado, provolone cheese, spinach, tomato, and onion) or "North Island Dental Clinic" (turkey, ham, bacon). But try a main dish like eggplant Parmesan or chicken with sautéed mush-rooms. Or a massive chunk of lasagna, plus bread and salad. Coffee? You get a huge French-style press-the-coffeedown affair. Your big decision: eat out on the flower-strewn boulevard patio or inside among black leather easy-chairs and a giant screen? Open for lunch and dinner daily until 10 p.m. (until mid-night Friday and Saturday). Inexpensive. — E.B. (6/06)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Greek Town 345 West Main Street, El Cajon, 619-441-9708. Just another Greek buffet? Well, yes. Your choices are standard: gyros meat, spanakopita, moussaka, dolmades. And the decor is the usual blue and white with Greek island posters. But it's the customers who give it an exotic feel, speaking languages from Russian to Greek to Somali. And if you're hungry, this all-you-can-eat deal is great. Have gyros meat, but also try the chicken souvlaki (grilled lemon chicken), or start with the excellent dolmades (grape leaves wrapped around beef and rice). The leaves' tangy taste and the lemony sauce inside get your juices running. Don't for-

get salad...or the dessert table (how could you leave without baklava?). Open for lunch and dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. — $E.B.\ (1/04)$

Grossmont Student Center Cafe**teria** Grossmont College, 8800 Grossmont College Drive, El Cajon, 619-644-7000. This is no UCSD, with its dozen food franchises and Persian and Somali food tents on campus. Grossmont's single cafeteria (open to the public) is big, echoey, and sticks to standardissue food like crumb-coated chicken katsu, cheeseburgers, burritos, and really, really cheap pizzas. Breakfast? How about a sausage and tater tot burrito? Health fans do have a plentiful salad bar. It's quite an experience, sharing lunch with local and foreign students, looking over the rolling hills to El Cajon — like being at an international finishing school in, well, Switzerland. Open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday to Thursday; till 2 p.m. Friday. Closed weekends. Inexpensive.

Mario's de la Mesa 8425 La Mesa Boulevard (at Grant), La Mesa, 619-461-9390. The man on the *burro* (seen on the restaurant's sign and menu) holds two flags, those of Mexico and the U.S.A. — very appropriate. Few dishes (except maybe the *menudo*) will push the paler palate too far in any direction, but gosh-all, everything is so darn tasty. Tamales are a house special: rich, pillowy clouds of cornmeal surrounding richer shredded pork scattered with raisins for a smidgeon of sweetness. Pork also gets loving treatment in the carnitas rojas, big chunks browned to the barest crisp, which falls away to melting tenderness. Great marinade (cumin?) on the carne asada; intense flavor and buttery richness on the "machaca sonora style" (dry-roasted shredded beef). Beans are so light as to seem whipped; rice is studded with peas and spicy carrots. Service is fast and friendly. Breakfast and lunch Sunday and Monday; three meals Tuesday through Saturday. Ranas.Com 9683 Campo Road, Suite A, Spring Valley, 619-589-1792. With 33 Mexican restaurants in the area, this Mexico City eatery has got to be good. It's a cheery place with lime green walls and orange accents. Cooking from the capital tends to be less bitingly hot than some northern food, with unexpected taste combos, like *pollo en salsa de cacahuate* (an almost Thai-tasting chicken in peanut sauce which comes with rice,



Woodstock's Pizza 6145 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-265-0999. It's a college pizza joint, but the fare rates well above standard beer ballast. For that matter, the beers — Karl Strauss and Wyder's Ciders (along with the usual Coors Light and Bud) — aren't exactly chug-suds. Crusts — white or sweetly robust whole wheat — are pressed, tossed, and then folded over at the edge, producing a spongy, crunch-crusted rim. The mozzarella is rich, gooey wholemilk; the marinara sauce is dark and spicy; and the toppings are fresh, hearty standouts. Watching your weight? Two low-fat combos (half the cheese) are available. Inexpensive. — A.M. (4/02)

FAR EAST

The Hideout Steakhouse and Saloon 27413 Highway 76, Santa Ysabel, 760-782-3656. If you're a Harley-Davidson weekend warrior, this is for you: an old dark timbered roadhouse peeking out of the trees, with its own spring-fed water wheel, 3000 feet up the mountains. Back in the thirties, Hollywood celebs (Roy Rogers, Alfalfa, et al.) used to hang out here on huntin' and fishin' trips. Now, bike enthusiasts make it their weekend day-trip destination. It still has a 1920s fireplace roaring at one end, a big pot-belly stove at the other, a honky-tonk upright piano, and a forty-foot-long oakwood bar. Cheeseburgers are the default dish. Available are a "Texas-sized baked

potato," vegetables, salad, and squaw bread. Open Saturday and Sunday only. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/02)

Owl Cafe 674 Main Street (between 6th and 7th), El Centro, 760-336-0298. This classic American café is over 50 years old and still serves good rib-sticking food morning, noon, or night. Try breakfast special #1: pancakes, two eggs, and two bacon strips. For lunch, the French dip sandwich. Full-plate dinners — and they are full — include roast beef and chicken-fried steak. Open Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. (bar until 2 a.m.); Saturday, bar only. Closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (8/01)

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

Alex's Brown Bag 2550 Fifth Avenue (at Laurel), Suite 171, uptown, 619-231-2912. The reborn Alex's (now in the Mr. A's building) is rightly famous for its "Original Philadelphia cheese steak sandwich" (with fried bell peppers, onions, mushrooms, and mozzarella). The owners say what makes their sandwiches so special is that they have the meat trucked in from cheese steak central, South Philly itself. Other Italian-American goodies include the Italian Stallion (Genoa salami, capocolla prosciutto, and mortadella sausage meat), eggplant parmigiana with hot garlic bread, grilled pastrami, and cheese on rye. Open for breakfast, lunch, and just-after-work dinner weekdays. — E.B. (9/01)

Busalacchi's Ristorante 3683 Fifth Avenue (at Pennsylvania), uptown, 619-298-0119. Remember Olympia Dukakis in Moonstruck retreating for comfort to her local trattoria? Busalacchi's has that settled, warm feel, but it's more interesting. Multi-levels create nooks and crannies for liaisons dangereuses, or there's the streetside casual level. Niche fountains and faux marble columns make it feel old-fashioned. Being Sicilian, they have plenty of the tomato-sauce-dominated dishes (like torta di melanzana, eggplant layered with mozzarella). But also try the excellent calamari piccata, a calamari "steak" bathed in butter, mushrooms, lemon, capers, and white wine. Simple but delish. Or salads like *insalata di* fileto with filet mignon, goat cheese, walnuts, eggs, and arugula. And hey, if you want to keep the budget intact, nothing wrong with spaghetti della casa. Lunch Monday through Friday; dinner nightly. Moderate to expensive. -E.B. (2/04)

DMood 4628 Park Boulevard (at University Heights overhead street sign), 619-297-6663. This delightfully decorated bistro offers eclectic Middle Eastern cuisine that's primarily Persian but offers touches of North Africa, India, Southern Europe, and the U.S. Don't miss the splended appetizer sampler (a full array of luscious Middle Eastern tapas), the pomegranate-glazed game hen stuffed with basmati rice and fruit, or the skewered lamb. The daily fresh fish gives talented chef Cecilia Tajonar a chance for creative play. Persian ice creams in sexy flavors (rosewater, orange blossom, pistachio) are among the dessert choices. Live entertainment at many brunches and weekend dinners provide vibrant cultural experience. Interesting teas (including Persian and Moroccan); okay wine list; full bar. Flavors tend to be intense; some creations (such as a bacon-cured salmon sandwich and *pantelleria*, a celery-date spread) are wonderful, others are exhausting even in small portions. Both locations offer pastry cases full of desserts that live up to "extraordinary," to eat on-site or to take home. Chefowner Karen Krasne incorporates flavors inspired by the global reach of her travels, from the cooking schools of

Gulf Coast Grill 4130 Park Boulevard (between University and El Cajon), Hillcrest, 619-295-2244. You can also get sashimi, Japanese appetizers, and a few mixedethnicity entrées (noodles, pasta, teriyaki, tempura) made with seafood or chicken breast. Beef is served, but numerous dishes are vegetarian. Good sake list. Sound system runs loud inside; patio dining available in warm weather. Reservations for sushi bar accepted but not necessarily honored Open weekdays for lunch, dinner nightly until midnight, with a DJ Tuesday through Saturday. Sushi prices lower than most, entrées inexpensive to moderate. - N.W. (4/03)

Joe's New York-Style Deli Royal Food Mart, 3401 First Avenue (at Upas), Banker's Hill, 619-295-7666. You enter a time machine: A cavernous concrete-floored deli that dates back to 1902, with a high ceiling, acorn-shaped hanging lights, and a big old-fashioned cooler-counter packed with cheeses hams, and sausage meat. Old display cases carry olives, pâté, Ryvitas. A sawed-off wooden barrel bulges with Hungarian wines, Go for wraps, jumbo hot dogs with sauerkraut, or East Coast-generous sandwiches like corned beef, dry Genoa salami, cotto salami, bologna, or liverwurst. That Boars Head liverwurst is da bomb. Caesar salad with chicken or a cup of tortellini soup are good light alternatives. Open breakfast through early dinner daily. - E.B. (4/05)

Lotus Thai 3761 Sixth Avenue (at Robinson), Hillcrest, 619-299-8272. Also at 906 Market (at Ninth Avenue), downtown, 619-595-0115. This restaurant has taken a giant step up from standard Thai eateries. Most of the menu consists of the usual dishes, but each branch also offers a selection of chef's specialties. Some of these are more authentic; others are more creative than the norm. The chefs are from

northern Thailand, and something in their cooking hints of their region — a certain zestiness, a love of strong citruses and fresh herbs that speaks of the Ping River and the hills of Chiang Mai. Well-chosen, affordable wine list, Asian and American beers, and cocktails based on *soju* (Asian lower-proof rice liquor), including a yummy rambutan cosmo. Noisy when crowded. Reservations recommended for Hillcrest on weekends. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/06)

Prado House of Hospitality, Balboa Park, 619-557-9441. In a magical space at the heart of Balboa Park, Prado fea tures cute neo-Nouveau decor and a something-for-everyone menu of American-Mexican-Italian-with-Asian-touches cuisine. The food brings few surprises, but is flavorful and served in huge portions. Top choices include meaty crab cakes and an astonishingly tender, slow-roasted pork loin. A meringue-based banana *tres* leches cake is everyone's favorite dessert. The bar makes a nice stop during a museum-crawl and offers ethe-real fried oysters and a range of gussiedup margaritas. Keep an eye out for special prix fixe dinners that include tickets to museum exhibitions. Dinner reservations vital. Vast interior can be noisy, but heated, umbrella-topped terrace tables are quiet and scenic. Moderate to a little expensive, with reasonable wine list. — *N.W.* (12/00)

Rannoush 3890 Fifth Avenue (south of University), Hillcrest, 619-325-1360. The full menu of Lebanese-Jordanian cuisine runs from mezze (tapas) to house-made sausages and kebabs to desserts — and includes fabulous falafel that's actually good enough to eat (especially the stuffed version). At this petite, pretty place with Scheherazade decor, all the cooking is from scratch—no nasty instant falafel mix or any other shortcuts, and you can really taste the difference. Other great dishes include vegetarian kebbeh, soujok sausages, and shrimp kebabs. Desserts include exotic ice creams in sexy flavors like cardamom and honey-lavender. Wines and beers include food-friendly imports from Lebanon. Open daily, lunch 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. — (3/06)

Saffron Noodles and Sate 3737 India Street, South Mission Hills, 619-574-7737. It's the smell of the spicy chicken grilling that will get you every time. Whatever the recipe is — and Su-

Mei Yu, the owner and celebrated cookbook author, says it's from the Isaan, Thailand's ethnic Lao Northeast — it catches your nose. We're talking "boxing arena grilled chicken," after the place where she smelled its spicy cooking aromas while growing up in Bangkok. You have a choice of five sauces to go with the chicken, from peanut to sweet pepper. Also try the noodle soups, like Tom Yam with shrimp: sinus-clearing, delicious, and surprisingly filling. The food here is real, fresh, genuine Thai cuisine with Chinese echoes - like Su-Mei Yu herself. Middle-class San Diego seems to have adopted her eatery, despite the fact you're in a pretty stark gray-andwhite room with views of I-5. Open for lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. - E.B. (3/04)

Zocalo Grill 2444 San Diego Avenue (a block north of Old Town Cemetery), Old Town. 619-298-9840. This casual, festive spin-off of the Brigantine chain features "Pacific coastal cuisine," an eclectic international hodgepodge with a faint Mexican accent and "something for everyone." And some of those somethings are delicious — a stacked salad of shrimp and avocados, or coconut-shrimp kebabs emerging from a pineapple, or a huge, beautifully grilled spiny lobster with avocado salsa. Appetizers are discounted at happy hour, and you can make a whole dinner out of substantial "tapas" sized for sharing. The heated, semi-roofed outdoor terrace encourages al fresco dining yearround. Full bar with creative margaritas, eight draft beers, and California wines including Brigantine's own cus-tom blends at good prices. Wheelchair lift in back, ramp at south side of terrace. Reservations strongly advised for weekends. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Moderate. — *N.W.* (10/02)

DOWNTOWN

Bandar Fine Persian Cuisine 825 and 837 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-0101. In a comfortable setting, the Persian menu offers just a "pick hits list" of popular dishes culled from this fabled cuisine, but the cooking is first rate, featuring fine ingredients prepared with care, skill, and healthfulness. The "Bandar Special" entrée combo lets you choose any two kebabs (chicken, game hen, or beef), beautifully marinated and cooked to your order. Entrées featuring rice with poultry are elaborate and refined, spiked with tangy barberries, sour cherries, or lentils and dates. The list of Persian desserts now includes Persian ice cream, a rose-scented exotic treat. Open daily for lunch (limited menu) and dinner. Moderate. - N.W. (1/04)

Broadway Pizza 1008 Broadway (at Street), downtown, 619-232-6264. This restaurant, near the downtown Senior Center and City College, offers no-nonsense Italian-American food. And they're not skimpy: from a pizza slice to barbecue beef sandwiches to a Louisiana-style sausage link sub, portions are gener-ous. If you want a hearty dinner, try the whole slab of beef ribs, with veggies, garlic bread, and salad. Unfortunately the quality has dropped; the formerly fine pizza, for instance, is now marred by oily, low-grade mozzarella and notso-great optional deli-meat toppings. But the main thing is, while the rest of downtown snores, they're still open, from 10 a.m. to to 3 a.m., seven days. And they'll even deliver to nearby neighborhoods. Inexpensive. N.W. (9/03)

China Too 916 Fifth Avenue (near E China 100 916 FIRH AVEILUE (Heat 2. Street), Gaslamp, 619-239-4283 or 619-239-1456. Don't blink or you'll miss this Gaslamp bargain. The menu claims "New York-Style Fine Chinese Cuisine." Would you settle for decent Brooklyn- or Bronx-style eat-in/takeout? Here you're getting cheap-butgood Chinese fare for the price of a cup of soup nearby. Lunch specials (with soup, two egg rolls, rice) include green pepper steak with onions, kung pao hot chicken, beef broccoli, shrimp with veggies — all made with no MSG and minimal cornstarch. The owner's last place was in New York, where customers ranged from Kofi Annan to Robin Leach. Chef Chen even has some of his old dishes here, on a page of multi-regional "chef specialties" (#90 to #107 on the menu). But what really makes this a "New York-ish" spot will bring joy to hungry mouths all over the restaurant-starved stretch east and south of Balboa Park: free delivery from I-8 to Harbor Drive, from Pacific Highway to 805 or even farther. Open 11 a.m. to 10 p.m.; closed Saturday. In-expensive. — E.B. (3/06)

Downtown Johnny Brown's 1220 Third Avenue (in the Community Concourse at Third and B), downtown, 619-232-8414. Walk up through the Community Concourse past the ship fountain and bingo! — downtown's answer to a European sidewalk café. Place has a generous patio of chairs and umbrellas. All green and white. You get two types here: sportminded types (a dozen TV screens, Chargers, Padres, Aztecs banners inside), and city government workers. Burgers are good, but try the breast of chicken burger with soup of the day or fries. Chicken's grilled, edge-burnt, spicy. Soup's bobbing with fresh-cut vegetables. Also, salads: taco or Southwest Chicken. What's best: sitting outside and watching people — not traf-fic — bustle by. — E.B. (4/03)

The Field Irish Pub and Restaurant 544 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp 619-232-9840. This spirited, colorful saloon, physically transported whole hog from the Ould Sod, offers delicious Irish music live most nights, and also attempts serious Irish cooking — with some successes. Try the lovely herbrich Irish stew, or the boxty, potato crêpes rolled around your choice from a variety of fillings (salmon, beef, etc.). Or start the day here with a huge, carnivorous Irish breakfast. Open daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

Greystone 658 Fifth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-232-0225. The Italian steakhouse fare here centers on dry-aged prime beef, game meats (including exceptionally tender bison), lobster, and pastas as the main draws, with indifferent starters and desserts. An impressive wine list offers rewarding California and Italian bottlings at \$35 to \$50, but roars up to the stratosphere of first-growth Bordeaux, su-per-Tuscans and scandalously overpriced Napa reds. Bossy, sometimes-abrasive waiters push higher-priced choices. Patrons are mainly "suits" with deep expense-ac-count pockets, loudly talking business or enjoying raucous office parties in a testosterone-high atmosphere. Wheelchair access to the street patio and bar area only (dining rooms are up or downstairs). Reservations urged, but may not be honored promptly. Dinner nightly. Extremely expensive. – N.W. (12/01)

Monsoon Exotic Cuisine of India 729 Fourth Avenue (off G Street), Gaslamp, 619-234-5555. The younger sister to Hillcrest's Bombay Exotic Cui-

sine shares the same chefs and serves much the same standard repertory of "Northern Indian cuisine made easy. with a few tropical additions vaguely inspired by Southern flavors, Curries are indistinct from each other and run to the mild side, no matter what you specify. Breads are good; tandooris disappointingly soft-surfaced. A room-di-viding fountain recreates the roar of the namesake tropical downpour. Add a lively dinner crowd and it's a (Gunga) din. Solid wine list, some Indian beers, full bar specializing in sweet cocktails, Open daily. Inexpensive buffet lunches; moderate à la carte dinners until 11 p.m. — N.W. (10/04)

Mr. Tiki's Mai Tai Lounge 801 Fifth Avenue (at F Street), Gaslamp, 619-233-1183. If you loved Trader Vic's (or can remember it, anyway), you may be amused at the revival of the genre here. Check out the "grass skirt" decor with huge tiki gods and the vaguely "islander" cuisine featuring, in addition, Asian fusion items, elementary sushi, and the occasional sprint into fusioncuisine seafood. But, as you might guess, the greatest creativity in the house goes into the silly umbrella cocktails, and those are mainly delish. Age 21 and over after 9 p.m. (even with parents). Dinner nightly. Cocktails until 11 p.m., weekends until 1 a.m. Moderate. — N.W. (10/04)

Osetra 904 Fifth Avenue (at E Street). Gaslamp, 619-239-1800. Possibly the most expensive restaurant in San Diego. Osetra is named for a precious, near-endangered caviar (which it serves) and attracts patrons who enjoy throwing their money around. The atmosphere is pure Las Vegas, with two floors of loud ambient music, glitzy decor, and a "wine angel" in black tights hoisting herself around a gleaming glass tower to fetch your precious bottle. Celebrities and big spenders get attentive service, others take their chances. The menu is mostly seafood, but it, too, carries the Vegas imprimatur of vulgar bad taste. Too many bold flavors are at war on almost every plate, and even the simplest dishes are overwrought frenzies of fusion. Best bets for satisfying your palate and curiosity: raw oysters, the cold seafood platter, caviar (if your wallet and conscience can afford it). Disabled access to first-floor dining room only. Full bar. Dinner nightly, Sunday through Thursday to 10 p.m., Friday and Sat-

The Palm 615 I Street (at Sixth Avenue), Gaslamp, 619-702-6500. This upmarket chain steakhouse, open since 1926, claims to be the oldest family-operated white-tablecloth restaurant in the country, and it's spread all over the country as well. The Gaslamp branch, its 30th, is just like all the other branches, even down to decor details, which is the whole point - business travelers with contacts to impress can rely on it wherever they go. The fare features tender, wet-aged USDA Prime beef from the chain's own wholesale butcher and, for the really high-rollers, monster-sized Nova Scotia lobsters. Other good dishes are Shrimp Bruno (with a Dijon sauce), baked crab cakes with no filler, and the "Slater Special" which combines the last two in an appetizer. Don't eat meat, but do eat garlic? Try clams and shrimp sillippo and scare off the vampires. All dishes à la carte. Portions are generally gigantic on up. Key lime pie (a normalsized wedge) makes a good, tart dessert, and clean *macchinettas* make outstanding espresso. Excellent wine list, plenty by the glass; full bar. Valet parking Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Very expensive. — N.W. (2/06)

Panda Inn 506 Horton Plaza (top floor), downtown, 619-233-7800. Behind all the Panda Express fast-food stops is the smaller, more serious Panda Inn chain which originated many of the now-familiar dishes of semi-Americanized "Mandarin" cuisine (they claim to have invented orange chicken, and their version is vastly better than those at the 99-cent joints). Salt-and-pepper shrimp, tofu with eggplant, and meatball casserole with Chinese cabbage are among the more authentic choices. Preparations here are generally clean and grease-less with well-balanced flavors; spicy dishes are moderately hot unless you request otherwise. It's not the spot for high adventure, but it does offer dishes for all tastes. Moderate-priced banquet menus make this a good choice for family gatherings. Full bar. Validated parking in Horton Plaza garage; heated patio seating in dry weather. Lunch and dinner daily. Lunches inexpensive, dinner moderate. — N.W. (1/06)

Po Pazzo 1917 India Street (at Grape), Little Italy, 619-238-1917. The restaurant's name means "a little crazy," but owner Joe Busalacchi was crazy like a fox to open the first seriously swanky

eatery in Little Italy. The decor resembles the set of a Manhattan supper club in a black-and-white movie, right down to the gray color scheme and curvy booths. Music plays loudly (with a live pianist Thursday through Saturday), keeping the energy and noise levels high. You almost expect to see Frankie and Dino at the next table. The USDA Prime steaks are flash-roasted in a special oven at 1700 degrees (in the style of Ruth's Chris), and if they're a little chewy, they're also flavorful - especially the "Sicilian steak." But the pasta dishes are even better, and the veggies accompa-nying the entrées often outshine the proteins - the kitchen is still Italian at heart and the fundamental things apply. Full bar, Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner only weekends. Reservations advised. Expensive. — N.W. (10/04)

Samba Grill 510 Fourth Avenue (Horton Plaza, top level), Gaslamp, 619-236-1000. This huge restaurant serves Brazilian food and Brazilian spirit. The format is a *rodizio* — waiters circulate through the room with tall swords. impaling an ever-changing assortment of grilled meats (highly salted and cooked well done, but zesty nonetheless). On the side is a vast buffet of additional Brazilian entrées, vegetables, and salads. The staff are charmers, but make sure to ask for appetizer and dessert menus and the 100-bottle wine list if the server forgets to offer. Full bar includes authentic, irresistable Brazilian caipirinha lime cocktails, made by a roving "caipirinha girl." Exciting capoeira (martial arts-dance) performances Sat-urday nights on patio, about 6 p.m. Live band inside follows on weekends. Lunch and dinner daily, until 11 p.m. weekends. \$35 buys a more-than-full meal. Half price for kiddies; reduced price for buffet food only; extra cost for a special "gaucho feast" that includes additional meats, plus wild game choices upon request. — N.W. (6/06)

Sluggers by the Ball Park 1219 Market Street (at Park), downtown, 619-546-5973. Not your typical hot dog stand. Sluggers café is all glass, steel, cinder block, and new. This eatery catches much of the Padres business, selling Vienna-brand beef hot dogs and Polish sausages. "Served Chicago-Style" meaning, the dog's topped with tomato wedges, mustard, pickle, relish, onions, and peppers, all, they say, on a steamed poppy-seed bun from Chicago. Other goodies from the Windy City include the Comiskey Park Pole (a charbroiled

Polish sausage dog) and the Italian Stallion (charbroiled Italian sausage in bun). Place is still a little cinder blocky but a good rendezvous for a brewski and a dog after work. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/05)

Taka 555 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-338-0555. The seafood at this always-packed sushi bar and Japanese appetizer-restaurant is top quality. Ama ebi (sweet shrimp) from the live tank go down soft and silky smooth, unlike their frozen brethren. And the chefs are highly skilled: the well-seasoned rice is freshly made all evening, and for once the spicy scallop hand roll has scallops, mayo, cuke, and hot pepper running all the way through, not just plopped on top. Savory appetizers supplement the sushiincluding miso-baked black cod and mushroom-topped *agedashi* (lightly-fried) tofu. The one problem: the later you arrive, the louder it gets. Make reservations, and if you value your ears, go at an early hour. Dinner nightly. Most dishes inexpensive, but many little bites can eat a hole in your wallet. -N.W. (7/04)

Tamale Cart Outside Rancho Fresco, 1852 National Avenue, Barrio Logan, 619-338-9140. If you've ever wondered what it would be like to eat as the Aztecs ate, come here and try some of the tamales - classic Aztec food - in all their flavors. Tamales are sort of steamed cornmeal dumplings wrapped in corn husks, served with sauce. The choice of goodies stuffed in the middle can include strips of pork, beef, chicken, or cheese, as well as pineapple, strawberries, or coconut. While you're at it, try the traditional accompaniment, the champurrado drink: milk mixed with masa — ground corn meal — chocolate. and cinnamon. In this mainly Spanish speaking market you can sit, watch, and pick up a few bargains too. Tamales make a great breakfast. Three should do you. These are made by the Restaurant Chiapaneco up at 25th and Market. Open breakfast through late lunch seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B (10/02)

Top of the Market 750 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-234-4867. The upper-crust upper floor of the downtown Fish Market (see Multiple Locations listing) has largely the same food as the downstairs, plus a few luxury items (e.g., abalone) and occasion ally some creative appetizer specials. Prices are about 25% higher for identical items, in exchange for a slightly ele-

vated view and a dressier, white-tablecloth setting that's almost "formal" by San Diego standards — flip-flops and tank tops aren't allowed on men, and collared shirts (e.g., polos) are suggested at dinner. That doesn't mean that the atmosphere is quietly gracious — the room's just as huge, packed, and raucous as the lower realms, even on the terrace. Reserve, and expect a short wait anyway. Elevator provides wheelchair access. Open daily. Expensive. — N.W. (9/01)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

El Dorado 311 Palomar (at 3rd Avenue), Chula Vista, 426-4545. The food of Peru is arguably the zestiest in South America, and Chula Vista's growing Peruvian community expects authenticity. El Dorado is there for them. The papa relleno is pure bliss — a little football of creamy mashed potatoes, lightly fried around a filling of ground beef, olives, and raisins. Seco de cabrito features young goat in a complex, herbed stew exploding with cilantro. Peruvian ceviche is lively and garnished with chancho, smoked hominy-corn kernels. Alas, here in the far north, the cuisine's fire is tuned way down for the kiddies but there's always hot sauce. Reflecting the local population, half the menu here is Mexican — not tacos but more seri-ous dinner dishes, especially seafood, carried out with above-average flair. Breakfast and dinner daily, lunch weekdays. Inexpensive to moderate. -N.W. (10/04)

The Family House of Pancakes 562 Broadway (across from Chula Vista Center), Chula Vista, 619-425-5133. This is a great place for three things; your family, your kids, and your appetite. The restaurant is famous for its "Grandma's' buckwheat pancakes, its banana-pecan pancake, and its rolled pancakes, oozing with berries and topped with cream and powdered sugar. Just try and survive their 8-12 egg omelet! Other good bets include a deluxe burger with French fries, tomatoes, and house sauce, and a grilled tuna sandwich with fries. Breakfast/lunch only, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

Island Pasta 1202 Orange Avenue (at Loma Street), Coronado, 619-435-4545. This unassuming, spill-out-on-the-

street restaurant somehow got it right. Simple tables on the sidewalk, daily made-on-the-premises semolina pasta, most dishes costing in the single digits. A simple fettuccine Alfredo is a pleasure al fresco with a glass of wine, sparkling against the fresh flowers on the table, watching Coronado's world go by. One good — and vegetarian — special to ask for is the *verdure* pasta, a combo of artichoke hearts, spinach, capers, mush-rooms, onions, and olives over spaghettini. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

La Bella Pizza Garden 373 Third Avenue (at F Street), Chula Vista, 619-426-8820. From the outside, La Bella looks like an Italian farmhouse, with geraniums, bright green shutters. and maroon canopies. A real extended family runs this business. Their secrets are: long hours (from breakfast until after midnight daily), big meals, and small prices. The menu includes standards like spaghetti with meatballs or lasagna, including sides of garlic bread, soup, or salad. The hit with kids is "Papa's Favorite," an 8-inch pizza with mushrooms, pepperoni, and sausage. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. -E.B. (3/01)

Mary J's Cafe 1930 Cleveland Avenue, National City, 619-477-6645 or 619-477-5306. Mary J and her café have been around for 40 years and about the only thing to change is the prices. This is the real National City. The regulars start piling in at 5 a.m. Mary always has specials going, but check the big board menu above the stove too. One of their most popular items is the Trucker's Breakfast (three eggs, ham, bacon or sausage, home fries, and toast), or steak and eggs with hash browns and toast. Mary's son Vic, the morning cook, always gives you more than enough. For lunch or early dinner, try the meat loaf with mixed veggies, boiled potatoes cov-ered with gravy, toast, and soup or salad. Or chicken-fried steak with all the fixings. Also hefty: cheeseburgers or tuna melts (with fries plus soda included in the price) and that old American favorite, a fried egg sandwich with chips. Open 4:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (6/02)

Miguel's Cocina 1351 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-437-4237. Also 2912 Shelter Island Drive, Shelter Island, 619-224-2401, and 970 Eastlake Parkway, Chula Vista, 619-656-2822. Cached inside the courtyard of a "Spanish Colo-

nial" mini-mall, Miguel's breezy trellised patio draws a dense dinner crowd from the nearby Del. The prime-time wait for a table may be worth it if you're in a gringo-Mex mood, especially if you've got kids in tow. Although the cooking is blandly pleasant (even the guacamole is under-seasoned), it's surprisingly painstaking. Soups are built on fine stocks, salads can be vibrant, and seafood is treated so tenderly that the numerous shellfish-stuffed tortilla concoctions (shrimp enchiladas, lobster burritos) are positively luscious. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. -N.W. (9/00)

Tin Fish Imperial Beach Pier, 910 Seacoast Drive, Imperial Beach, 619-628-8414. At a table by this fish shack at the far end of the pier, you can watch people and pigeons (and people feeding pigeons) as you dig into huge portions of simple seafood, appetized by the sea air. The bill of fare fish - fried, grilled, chowdered, or wrapped into burritos, tacos, or sandwiches. The big fried combos are about what you'd expect, but more piquant pleasures come in smaller packages. (Portions are generous, whatever you order.) The spicy fish tacos are really spicy, while the fried onion rings are of surpassing delicacy. Best of all, the crab cakes are huge and seriously crabby, with plenty of meat and very little filler. With a call, they'll give you a lift from the parking lot to their restaurant. A second branch at 170 Sixth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-238-8100, offers patio dining across from the Convention Center, with live music during summer. Both locations open daily for lunch and early dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. N.W. (7/01)

stars of boxing and bullfighting. But mainly it was a haven for Spanish jai alai players desperate for Old Country food. This is one of Tijuana's great historic eateries, its tale written on the walls. Old border photos, Don Quixote art, fighting bull ranchos' brands, and a matador's framed green cape with his blood still on it. The food's all Spanish, so paella is big (with soup, salad, French bread, and bleu cheese), but also try the baby eel appetizers, chorizo (pork sausages), bacalao (cod fish) a la Viz-caina, trout with olive oil and garlic, and Gallican octopus. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (5/02)

El Nido Boulevard Benito Juárez #67 (1-1/2 blocks north of Hotel Festival Plaza), Rosarito Beach, Baja, 661-612-1430. Head south if you're looking for a great dry-aged, mesquite-broiled steak at a bargain price — but don't stop there. Try the house specialty, quail with garlic sauce (codorniz al mojo de ajo), or venison, especially the savory machaca de venado (strips of meat with peppers, onions, and tomatoes). Both are locally raised on the restaurant's own ranches, and may be united in a brilliant breakfast of quail eggs with deer machaca. Seafood and surf-and-turf variations are tasty, too. The restaurant's name means "the nest" and the amusing indoor-outdoor decor is a sort of multiroom aviary with birds singing chirping, and fluttering all over. Full bar. If sensitive to smoke, don't sit next to the mesquite-burning hearth on the roofed

patio. Dressy-casual. Bilingual staff and menu. Open daily, early morning to late evening. Mostly moderate; cash only. — N.W. (4/03)

Fonda Roberto's Avenida Cuahuté moc #2800 (at Agua Caliente Boulevard, next to CESUN Universidad), Tijuana, 686-4687. How often do you get to eat something totally new? Like huazontle the Aztecs' ϊ¿Ωred spinachï¿Ω? Roberto's presents it as an egg-covered mass of baby sprigs wrapped around a sausage of Monterrey cheese, all swimming in a chocolatey mole sauce. You haul the *huazontle* branches through your teeth to de-seed them, just as Montezuma did 500 years ago. This is the fascination of Roberto Reyes's eatery. It's a tribute to his home state of Puebla in the heartland of Mexico. Cactus plays a big part: Dedos Montezuma (ϊ;ΩMontezuma's fingersï¿Ω) is cactus stuffed with steak; torta de camaron seco is a shrimp patty topped with cactus; cecina Oaxaqueña is cured meat with cactus salad. But there're also steaks, *mole* poblano (chocolatey chicken with seven different chiles), and the delicious *chile* en nogada (chile pepper stuffed with beef, fruits, and nuts — fried in egg and covered with creamy nut sauce). Nice dining room too - built around a fountain. Open 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.; closed Monday. Moderate. — E.B. (2/05)

La Diferencia Avenida Sánchez Taboada 10611-A, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-3346 or 634-7078. Mexican haute cuisine, with inventive combinations of traditional flavors. The creative menu reframes the old dishes and devises new ones. Wine list centers on Baja winerie (Monte Xanic and Cetto) at reasonable prices. Secure, free valet parking next to exterior courtvard. Menu is in Spanish (in a hard-to-read font), but some

staffers speak some English. The restaurant is often noisy, even louder when mariachis play. Smoking permitted. Wheelchair access marginal. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive.

Los Pelícanos Calle de Cedro 115 #45 (west of Juarez), Rosarito Beach, Baia, 661-612-0445 or 661-612-1757. This hotel dining room is El Nido's little (and less gifted) sister, with a shorter menu and perhaps less careful cooking. It serves good steaks and surf-and-turf in a handsome room and, at lunch, on a pretty ocean-view terrace. To find it, look for large sign on west side of Juarez, north of the tourist hub, directing you to the site. One winding flight up to the restaurant, no elevator. Bilingual staff and menu. Full bar. Open daily, three meals. Moderate; cash only. -N.W. (4/03)

Mariscos el Locochón Popotla fishing village, five minutes south of Rosar-ito Beach (non-toll road), dirt road next to Fox studios. There are smarter places to eat, like Puerto Nuevo. Even in Popotla, most other eateries look more like, well, eateries. The thing about Pedro Garcia Barcelo and El Locochón is that they are what they are. His fishermen friends hand him fish straight off the boats, he sells them on a table in the sand, and if you so desire, he'll toss one into a pan of oil on a wood fire, fry a couple of corn tortillas, add cilantro, tomatoes, radishes, fried *cebollitas* (green onions), and presto! He'll hand you your freshest fish taco ever. Work out a price with him. He's there every day till dusk. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (3/04)

Mercado Sobre Ruedas (From Tiexit; turn left at third traffic light then an immediate right onto Colonia Lucio Blanco.) Don't miss this huge flea market that materializes every Sunday (from morning until mid-afternoon) a couple of miles north of the tourist part of town. Its dozens of food-booths offer a vast variety of local treats, ranging from barbecued mutton (borrego) to savory Jalisco-style goat stew (birria de chivo) to all manner of tacos, made-to-order hotcakes with syrup, "Mexican hamburg-ers," and Sno-Kones (don't worry about the ice; by law, it has to be made with purified water). The food is totally authentic, cooked to Mexican tastes, and it's a carnival for the mouth. Many vendors speak some English. Rock-bottom prices; cash only. — *N.W.* (4/03)

MULTIPLE LOCATIONS

Anthony's Fish Grotto 1360 North town, 619-232-5103; 215 West Bay Boulevard, Chula Vista, 619-425-4200; 9530 Murray Drive, La Mesa, 619-463-0368. You're going to get a sore neck at the downtown flagship of this local chain, splitting your time between your meal, your partner, and the harbor scene outside. If you don't want overcomplicated food, Anthony's obliges. Fish and chips is still the simplest and the best. Or Mama's Platter, cod combined with batter-fried calamari, shrimp, oysters, scallops, and clam strips. Anthony's has been up and running for six decades now, with the buying power to get the pick of the catch. The menu offers 18 different seasonal fish to choose from, plus — if you've got the bread —

delicious lobster dishes (in season) like lobster thermidor with a creamy, winey sauce. Try to be there at sunset when the water-sky show will do its darndest to distract you. No reservations. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Moderate. - Ė.B. (12/05)

Fish House Vera Cruz 360 Via Vera Cruz (in back of "Restaurant Row"), San Marcos, 760-744-7346. Additional locations in Carlsbad and Temecula. This affordable seafood eatery packs in diners like sardines. Fresh fish and lots of it is the happenin' thing. On a recent day, 23 different fresh fish selections were available as daily specials, on top of the regular menu of crab, lobster, ovsters shrimp, catfish, etc. All fish are grilled plain, with nothing added but a dab of tartar sauce. The seafood is so fresh you don't really mind. Each entrée includes a choice of side dishes, two for lunch and three for dinner. The Manhattan chowder is especially tasty, as is their "krab" salad. The Fish Market 750 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-232-3474. There's something fishy about these crowded, noisy, ever-multiplying restaurants — namely, mesquitegrilled, skewered, steamed, or panko-fried seafood, plus piscine chowders, pastas, and salads. Preparations are generally simple and consistent among locations. All the raw seafood is pro cessed at the chain's Northern California facilities, so when the menu refers to a "local" species it merely means it's from somewhere in the Pacific, Small retail fish market in the downtown branch offers slightly fresher products than at most supermarkets. Identical

products and dishes are served in the dining room, the oyster bar, and at Top of the Market But the sushi bar is emphatically the top Fish Market venue, with just-right rice, pristine seafood, and expert preparation. The "Ichiban Hamachi" (also available in the dining rooms) is outstanding — and for a sexy treat, share a pair of "Honeymoon Oysters" with your honey. No reservations, but the space is vast so waits are brief. Restaurant open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. Also in Del Mar at 640 Via de la Valle, 858-755-2277; mini-branch near Fashion Valley, 2401 Fenton Parkway, 619-280-2277. — N.W. (9/01)

Il Fornaio 1333 First Street, Coronado, 619-437-4911. Also at Del Mar Plaza, 1555 Camino Del Mar, Del Mar, 858-755-8876. Il Fornaio's defensive architecture walls it off from the Great Unwashed — the tourists wandering around Coronado's Old Ferry Landing — but it's worth breaching if only to get your teeth into their to-die-for bread. "Il fornaio" means "the baker," after all. Beyond bread, we're talking rustic-feeling, herbal, ultra-fresh salads, and everyday Italian dishes ranging from sfilatino con bistecchina (thin grilled steak on a baguette with creamy dijon and salad) to a giant mesquitegrilled 22-ounce *bistecca alla fiorentina*, with lots of vegetarian and pasta dishes in between. A simple penne alla sor-rentina — pasta tubes with a tomato, mozzarella, and basil sauce — is charming. Pizza puttanesca is heaven too, if you're into anchovies. Interesting regional menus from different provinces of Italy pop up during the first two weeks of each month. Most staffers seem mind-blowingly knowledgeable. Moderate. — E.B. (1/02)

A Confused Quixote

When this Alonso Quijano becomes an imaginary knight-errant, he's a danger to the world.

n Cervantes's great novel, Don Quixote, the don interrupts Master Pedro's Moorish puppet show. "You've put church bells in mosques", the offended Don exclaims. Pedro, the puppeteer, replies, "Don't be looking for tri-

fles, Señor Quixote, or expect things to be impossibly perfect. Are not a thousand comedies performed almost every day that are full of inaccuracies and absurdities,

yet they run their course and are received not only with applause but with admiration and all the rest?"

Don Pedro's reply is probably the best approach to the San Diego Rep's world premiere of Don Quixote. The nearly three-hour production is wildly uneven, often tedious, silly, tonally confused, and thesis-heavy. It rambles as if it's been cut down but needs much more. At the same time, however, it has gems.

Such as the puppet show, performed by an eggplant, an onion, an orange (for the sun), a banana (for a crescent moon), various and sundry other produce — and Quixote's genocidal reaction. Â hater of Moors, he confuses the puppets for actual people, draws his sword, and slashes at them. As he does, the puppets become larger than life, including a giant he beheads. At once — and unlike the novel, which glosses over things painful — we see the scope of the don's illusions and the human costs of his religious fanaticism.

Paul Magid, of the legendary Flying Karama-

zov Brothers, wrote the script. Those expecting a doddering, romanticized Man of La Mancha dreaming impossible dreams, be forewarned: when this Alonso Quijano becomes an imaginary knight-errant, he's a danger to the world. As if try-

ing to free his version from the musical, and comment on current affairs, Magid makes the don less sympathetic (instead of tilting with windmills, you sense this

Quixote'd much rather invade Iraq). But in the book, and like Hamlet, Quixote's only mad northby-northwest. When he isn't obsessed with his chivalric ideal, he's just your normal 50-year-old gentleman, who eats lentils on Friday and a "pigeon extraordinary" on Sunday. Okay, he's also a virgin and reads too many pulp romances "with application and delight." And there's the rub.

Magid's emphasis makes Quixote too onenote. And even an actor of Peter Van Norden's considerable talents can't move the don beyond mere infantile xenophobia: brandishing his sword, plunging onward, and making a mess of things especially if the latter are Muslims, Jews, or Spanish conversos. He isn't noble. He's just nuts.

Cervantes — who, legend has it, died the same day as Shakespeare (April 23, 1616) — wrote Don Quixote in two parts: the first published in 1605; the second in 1615 and written, many claim, because the book had spawned so many imitators he had to kill off the don. When Quixote goes at the end of the play, sympathy gets mixed with relief that





he can do no more harm.

Magid plays the narrator, Cidi Hamete Benegeli. In contrast to Quixote's fanaticism, he advocates tolerance and acceptance of differences. Magid's moral earnestness is the most moving element of the show. He often enters the story, either to jack it up or inject more commentary. In doing so, however, he shoves Sancho Panza, and even Quixote, off to the side (as the don's sidekick, Willie G gets to do a knockout rap number, but, other than ride a tricycle, that's about it). The intrusive narrator, reduced versions of Quixote and Sancho, make for a sameness in most scenes: déjà boondoggle.

Don Quixote needs major cutting and tightening. The best parts are the interludes: as when the four Karamazovs juggle (and are funniest when they drop a bowling pin), or when a Catholic priest baptizes the audience, or when the group breaks into song. But the play's

the thing, and this one's still a work in progress.

Legends, a star vehicle for Joan Collins and Linda Evans, came and went last week. The "vehicle" turned out to be a train wreck. The "stars" posed and modeled high fashions but were consistently upstaged by better performances.

James Kirkwood's formulaic script pits feuding movie headliners against each other. They're an odd couple: Leatrice (Evans) only plays saints; Leatrice (Collins), sinners. A young producer wants them for Star Wars: The Play, in which sparks allegedly fly. When the two women meet to talk about the project, the biggest ones fly offstage.

After an endless, only intermittently funny first act, which includes racist stereotyping and a shameless Chippendales strip, Collins and Evans finally square off. Here's the money scene. But

their exchanges lack heat and get delivered in a shoulders-squared, I-speak-now-you-speak patter. Neither is in the moment. Each pseudo-argues, as in an early rehearsal, or as if they've done the lines so many times they're just routine. When it's time for the battle royale, they take it offstage, onto a balcony, and we hear rather than see the clash.

In effect, the staging masks the headliners. It demands little more from them than recreating their roles on Dynasty (of which members of the audience reminded each other, often, on opening night). Minor characters actually carry the show: Tonye Patano as a maid (of whose exit lines provide most of the humor) and Will Holman as the male stripper. Both are African-Americans in subservient roles. And when Collins's character tells the maid to "go pick cotton" in the kitchen, Legends scrapes the gutter of American theater.



the hook," playwright/poet Dael Orlandersmith said in an interview. Her drama looks at "internal racism," the rift between light- and dark-skinned African-Americans, and shows that "the people who have been enslaved" have taken on "the very bias that's been done to us." Yellowman follows the lives, and love. of Alma, a large, dark woman, and Eugene, a "high yellow" (light-skinned) man. The play moves from their childhood to the promise of marriage. Throughout they encounter differences of skin that encircle, and eventually destroy, their bond. Orlandersmith writes a tough poetry that never sounds "poetic' or preachy and weaves scenes solely from words, not stage directions. For Cygnet Theatre, talented director Esther Emery and a crack design team build visual pictures and movement from the language (Nick Fouch's set, a beige wall of corrugated tin and brick, has a wide slash across the center, within which Eric Lotze's lighting blazes South Carolina sunshine and NYC cold). Everything, including Veronica Murphy's subtle costumes and George Ye's equally subtle sounds, enhances the text. The playwright might object that Monique Gaffney and Mark Broadnax are much younger than the ages she asks for (Alma's supposed to be around 40 Eugene, 45) but couldn't object to their fine performances. Each plays several characters, vividly, and traces the growth of Alma and Eugene with exactitude. The result resembles Greek tragedy: how the sins, or in this case the prejudices, of the fathers can ruin not just the innocence, but also the very lives, of the young. Critic's pick.

you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but the "game show on Fridays - is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" — two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Balancing Act

The frenzy of the battlefield is not Eastwood's forte as a director.

ell, I can't say, along with so many others, that I preferred Letters from Iwo Jima to Flags of Our Fathers. My main misgiving about the earlier, the latter

film — its artily desaturated color, a possible hand-me-down from co-producer Steven Spielberg — is also ap-

plicable to the second part of Clint Eastwood's Second World War diptych, the Japanese-language, Japanese-perspective counterpart. (Could the English subtitles in some measure have mesmerized the critics?) Once more there is only the stray splash of color to clash with the near black-andwhite: the bright red Rising Sun disk at the center of the flag, the luscious amber liquid in a bottle of Johnny Walker, the orange-y blossoms and plumes of flame. If anything, though I don't have a convenient DVD against which to check my memory, the earlier film dipped a little deeper, a little oftener, into the color pots. But no real advantage either way.

The apparent trump card of the newer film — the exercise in empathy whereby the filmmaker re-examines the same subject, the costly Battle of Iwo Jima, from the opposite side of

the firing line — can stand some scrutiny. (Let's first of all reject as too roundabout, too far a stretch, any suggestion of repayment of debt on the part of an American icon whose screen

career was launched in a spaghetti-Western remake of a Japanese samurai film.) For an American production

to attempt to view an American war through the eyes of the other guys to attempt to portray the sameness, the oneness, of fighting men on whatever side — is in itself nothing new. It is, by one gauge, as old as the prototypical antiwar film, All Quiet on the Western Front, although that one, or any of its successors (A Time to Love and a Time to Die, The Blue Max, etc.), didn't attempt to do so in the other guys' native tongue. In addition to which, any number of films have attempted an internal balancing act, our side and theirs, sometimes even permitting the others to speak in their own tongues (The Young Lions, The Enemy Below, Hell in the Pacific, Tora! Tora! Tora!, etc.). More, then, than in the opposing-viewpoint angle or the foreign-language angle, the uniqueness of Letters lies in its distinction as part of a matched pair, an external

balancing act if you will, sharing numerous points of intersection with *Flags* while sharing no actual cast members. (The momentous flag-raising on Mount Suribachi now rates as no more than a speck in the distance.) The singularity of *Letters*, paradoxically put, lies in its complementarity.

Then, too, I would not want to underestimate the extraordinariness of making such an offering in a time of ongoing war. The Japanese of yore may bear little resemblance to our Islamic jihadists beyond the broad label of "enemy," and in truth the film grants scant representation to the more fanatical Japanese imperialists, and it makes no accounting whatsoever of the capturers and torturers of "Izzy," for example, in the earlier film. The

more difficult a thing is to explain, the less Eastwood is inclined to try. He seeks out commonality, not difference. (The American soldier who would rather shoot his prisoners than guard them provides a dim equivalent.) Even so, September 11, we are told, is our generation's December 7, and the kamikaze mentality lives on in very few cultures, and the same holds true

for the decapitation mentality, and the caves of Iwo Jima look very much as we might envision the hiding places of Osama bin Laden and his cohorts. The connections are easy to draw, the conclusions clear. And this, to repeat, is extraordinary. Audacious. Coura-

The new film begins at the exact spot where the earlier one ended, the clifftop monument that today overlooks the tranquil beach of black sand, and it proceeds from there to pick out further reminders - abandoned cannons, vacated bunkers — before it settles upon a present-day Japanese excavation crew, digging in the floor of one of the caves and uncovering what will be revealed in the film's final shot as the cache of correspondence that


gives the film its title, and gives its script some snatches of voice-over narration from differing points of view. Pending that revelation, the presentday diggers give way to some previous diggers, the trench-diggers on that black-sand beach in 1944. ("Am I digging my own grave?" ponders one of them in a letter to his pregnant wife.) The focus of dramatic interest ranges democratically from the high to the low. A couple of aristocratic figures at one end of the spectrum: first, the

humane but firm and fatalistic commander (the truly commanding Ken Watanabe), a one-time resident of the United States, now packing a pearlhandled handgun as a souvenir of that time, fully expecting to die on the island ("I am sorry I wasn't able to attend to the kitchen floor before I left," he writes in a letter home), but striving for the Alamo-like goal of holding out against overwhelming odds as long as possible, seeing every passing day as another day of safety

for his homeland; and second, the dashing gold-medal equestrian from the 1932 Los Angeles Olympics, a national celebrity who has entertained Douglas Fairbanks and Mary Pickford at dinner in Tokyo. In the middle: the rigid, iron-fisted disciplinarian and the highly trained but disgraced military policeman, demoted for his softhearted failure to carry out orders. And at the bottom: a select handful of humble grumbling grunts ("Weed soup again?"), interchangeable with those in any other army.

Letters is much more a straightforward battle film than its predecessor, which was more a memory film of battle and had as much to do with the aftereffects as with the immediate effects, filing away the warfare as indelible mental snapshots. (The flashbacks in Letters, within the film-long flashback, are few, brief, and succinct, nothing to compare with the complicated time-weave of Flags.) Eastwood, in the result, falls back here on a different, simpler, less effective anti-violence strategy, delaying the combat with evident distaste - fifty minutes to the first American air strike and another ten to the beach landing, announced, in a hair-raising moment, when the poor little baker is ordered to empty a shitpot outside the cave and gets an eyeful of the American armada - and then drenching the combat in maximum horror. This constitutes a conventional plan of attack, at first getting us to know and to care about the men and then cutting them to ribbons in front of us; and the conventionality is both a strength and a limitation: solid but inflexible. And despite the greater concentration on the battle per se (and the two-hourtwenty-minute running time), there is little sense of how long the battle lasted, and little sense, from what we are shown, of how it could have lasted as

long as it did. There is indisputably some strong stuff in the film: the death-with-honor serial suicides by hand grenade, the engulfing shower of flame from an opening in the roof of a cave, and the like. But the frenzy of the battlefield is not Eastwood's forte as a director. He often seems, there, to be cribbing from other models, if not turning over the reins to the second unit or the special-effects men: the stitchery of machine-gun fire in the dirt, the mushrooming fireballs, the jostled camera. His forte is, or relies on, stately, graceful, limpid classicism, conveying an Old World chivalry generally lacking in his on-screen persona, always treating his subjects, as well as his audience, with the utmost respect. And although the novelty of a commercial American director making an art-house Japanese film is in a strict sense invisible to the viewer, outside the picture frame, beyond the range of the camera, Eastwood's fingerprints are all over the screen. We all know (don't we?) that film is a visual medium; and the present film, subtitles notwithstanding, is a triumph of style, a triumph of manner, still more a triumph of tradition. It comes across as a bit preachier than Flags, where the filmmaker, with firmer footing on home turf, may have felt freer to let you draw your own lessons, may have felt less necessity to show his personal "understanding." Nonetheless, it offers a useful, a purposeful, a further refinement of his evolving views on violence. And if it runs the risk of collapse under the cumulative weight of his solemnity (four and a half hours total), the risk proves to have been a risk worth taking. A

risk rewarded. The sensible preference, finally, is not for one film over the other, but for both.

Apocalypto — Evidently Mel Gibson is in it only for the barbarity. Scouring the globe, roaming the pages of history, he has alighted here on the illuminating example of the Mayan people, past their civilized peak, where a happy, peaceable, practicaljoking tribe of jungle dwellers (sample joke: the prescription of a red-hot herb as a topical fertility drug, so that the duped hubby must, in full view of the guffawing villagers, hop around buck naked and plunk down his burning loins in a water trough — wait, it gets even better — and his wife must pour a pitcher of water down her gullet) is cruelly set upon and rounded up by a storm troop of fearsome, bloodthirsty, bone-inthe-nose killjoys in search of sacrificial offerings to their god Kukulkan. A paradise, in other words, no less than turn-of-the-13th-century Scotland in Braveheart or 1stcentury Palestine in The Passion of the Christ, where Gibson may indulge his appetite for mayhem, persecution, torture, martyrdom. (The nine-tenths-naked natives enable him, further, to indulge his lesser appetite for homoerotica.) The English subtitles and the no-name cast might almost lead you to believe, were it not for the telltale slickness and the Gibsonian slomo for dramatic stress, that you're watching a product of, say, the Guatemalan New Wave or the Undiscovered Belizean Cinema. At the very least, the film should do nothing to fan the flames of Gibson's suspected and substantiated anti-Semitism. And at the next least, the last-minute arrival on the scene of Christianity is not openly - and politically incorrectly applauded. That might be the film's one and only instance of restraint. Blood Diamond — Serviceable actionadventure despite frequent interruptions for sermonettes on human rights and capitalist wrongs. The ripped-from-the-headlines story (yesterday's headlines: civil war in Sierra Leone, 1999) features the stock figures of a self-interested soldier of fortune, in league with slaughterous rebels and unscrupulous jewellers, an engagé foreign correspondent, and a hapless native peasant enslaved in the diamond mines and separated from his family, all united on a treasure hunt for a priceless buried gem, "a pink," big as a walnut. Without the politics, the strong-arm manipulation of emotions would be inexcusable. Or rather, more


clearly inexcusable. It's still inexcusable even now. (The on-screen standing ovation at the final curtain is an unsubtle elbow-inthe-ribs to the moviegoer.) Behind the oped posturing, the film roughly resembles a middle-period, middle-drawer Robert Mitchum vehicle, except that Leonardo Di-Caprio, affecting an acceptable Afrikaner accent, is no Robert Mitchum. For all his recently acquired bulk, including the heftiness of his credits in Martin Scorsese's oeuvre, he remains too boyish to be a persuasive action hero: Robby Bensonitis, let's call it. Jennifer Connelly, meantime, is both capable and decorative as the journalist. And the only thing keeping Djimon Hounsou from total sympathy is the sanctimony in which his director, Edward Zwick, enwraps him. All three, along with their Dark Continent environs, are nicely, cleanly, warmly photographed by Eduardo Serra.

Borat: Cultural Learnings of America for Make Benefit Glorious Nation of Kazakhstan — For anyone who heretofore hadn't encountered the character on HBO, Borat Sagdiyev will need an introduction. He is one of the personas of British comedian Sacha Baron Cohen on Da Ali G Show, a Kazakh TV reporter dapperly dressed in a dove-gray suit, bristlingly mustachioed, blissfully sexist, supersti-Secret display window, and so on), ostensimentary for home consumption — a builtin excuse for bad camerawork. Scripted scenes, or at any rate pre-planned scenes, primarily involving Borat's obese and camera-shy producer, Azamat Bagatov (Ken Davitian), secondarily involving a slightly less obese African-American call girl (Luenell), and presumably also involving the proprietors of a Jewish B&B (how can we be sure?), alternate with unscripted performance-art pieces, so to call them, in which assorted innocents, dupes, patsies, and joke-butts are lured into the gag unawares. These unrehearsed bits, no doubt more compelling, more riveting, more nerve-racking than the planned-out parts, naturally give rise to thoughts of their comedic antecedents and analogues: Can-

did Camera, the practical jokes on a Dick Clark Bloopers special, MTV's copycat Punk'd, the crank calls of any wisenheimer radio deeiay, Andy Kaufman's chauvinistpig wrestling career, the Yes Men (and their eponymous film of a couple of years previous), etc. At the same time, they give rise to moral concerns — to say nothing of legal ones — that far overshadow artistic ones. Can, as an example, an Alabama minister's wife - bluntly insulted for her dearth of pulchritude — be safely assumed to be less of a human being than our fearless guerrilla artiste, or has the latter's sexism perhaps crossed over, there, from fiction into reality? Any diversion afforded by such thoughts is all to the good, because the general impression of the film, right down to

Casino Royale — Taking the title from Ian Fleming's first James Bond novel, the 007 franchise approaches the opportunity of a new James Bond as the opportunity of a new beginning. The new Bond, Daniel Craig, is not just another pretty face, in fact is a pretty craggy face (Craiggy face, perhaps that should be), and it can pretty well express itself in the bargain. Granted, noises were made about a similar rollback toward reality when Timothy Dalton came on board; and even in the midst of the reign of Pierce Brosnan, noises were made about toughening up his act. These proved to be only noises. The new noises are more. The obligatory pre-credits sequence, in blackand-white and sprinkled with flashbacks, shuns spectacle in favor of blunt brutality; and the action to follow seems to be under no compulsion to "top" all previous action. While Judi Dench reprises the role of "M," Bond himself has only just been promoted

to double-0 status (a new beginning for sure) and has yet to earn his boss's trust. There is no equivalent of "Q" and his cute presentation of the gadgets *du jour*. There is no casual bedding of "Bond girls," and the one romantic relationship (with the enigmatic, darkly eyelined Eva Green) attains an emotional weight beyond even the allthe-way-to-the-altar affair of On Her Majesty's Secret Service. The hero's lame quips and puns, meantime, have thoroughly been expunged from the script. And "I don't give a damn" is his response to the bartender's inquiry as to whether he'd like his vodka martini shaken or stirred. All these changes are definite improvements. And yet, and yet, and yet.... The action, even if somewhat scaled back under the one-time Bond director Martin Campbell (Goldeneye, the beginning of the Brosnan Bonds, but scarcely a *new* beginning), is still more than sufficiently cartoonish. The plotting is skimpy. The whole thing runs on far too long. And then there's the fundamental question: if you want to do an alternative to James Bond, why call him James Bond? Children of Men — The basic idea from a novel by P.D. James, a departure from her detective fiction - of a worldwide plague of female infertility, even though not at all original (see The Handmaid's Tale, as a prime example), remains nevertheless a potent metaphor for that science-fiction staple, the End of the World; and the film can thus sensibly refrain from hashing over the significance of a miraculous pregnancy in England, as inexplicable as the plague itself, eighteen years after its onset in 2008. A potent metaphor, that, for Hope, even Faith. (The young black woman's deadpan protestation of virginity is of course only her own little joke. What

she is carrying is not the Second Coming of Christ so much as that of Adam. Or, as it happens, Eve.) Because the world went so fast to hell so near in the future — "Only Britain soldiers on" — the film is not overburdened with production and special effects. It shoulders just sufficient texture and detail for an illusion of reality: the unswept litter and uncollected trash in the streets. the electronic animated billboards, the pirated artworks preserved for no one's edification at the Tate Modern, the gratis government-issued suicide kits (brand name: Ouietus; ad slogan; "You Decide When"), the concentration camps for illegal aliens, etc. There is really not much in the way of a story — underground dissidents squiring the expectant mother through chaotic countryside to an offshore rendezvous with a shadowy do-good organization known as the Human Project — but Clive Owen, the principal squirer, an uncommitted mercenary, has the ideal demeanor for the grimness of the mission; and the trek is nothing if not eventful, a mild word for an itinerary that includes three virtuoso action set pieces. If the camera sometimes calls attention to itself with its showboat mobility, and at one point with its blood-spattered lens, the staging of the action is always thorough and thought-out. As, for that matter, is the staging of the nonaction, in particular the hero's interplay with his exwife (Julianne Moore) and an aged flowerchild friend (Michael Caine), abubble with

emotional undercurrents. Director Alfonso Cuarón's moderation in the use of closeups, a rarer and rarer thing these days, disdains the easy way out. With Chiwetel Eijofor and Claire-Hope Ashitey. 2006.


Curse of the Golden Flower — The reunion of filmmaker Zhang Yimou with his one-time muse and leading lady, Gong Li, over ten years after their personal fallingout, post-Shanghai Triad, makes this film into a real "event," and the actress brings to it an inner fire to outglow even its moltenlava color scheme. In addition to which, the director's dynamic visual style demonstrates exceptional weight, balance, timing, and agility. In short, exceptional command of the screen. Watching his shots fall into place is a little like watching the piece-bypiece construction of a palace. Or temple. Nothing humbler would quite do justice to a tale of courtly and amatory intrigue (Tang Dynasty, 10th Century) that aspires to Shakespearean, even Sophoclean, tragedy. Without dispute, the film is some what talky and slow, but if it's preferable nevertheless to Zhang's Hero and House of Flying Daggers, the reason in large part would be precisely the long postponement of the gravity-defying martial arts. Defying, that is, of not only Newton's sort of gravity but that of Shakespeare and Sophocles as well. Dreamgirls — Broadway backstage musical - not, that is to say, backstage on Broadway but backstage in Motown charting the breakthrough of R&B into the pop mainstream in the Sixties, more specifically the rise of a girl group called the Dreams (rhymes with Supremes), and attendant heartbreaks, breakups, downfalls, and assorted other banalities. True, a musical can get away with a banal storyline if the music is good, but these Broadway-ized soul tunes are as insipid as they are incessant. It seems it's not easy to write another "Where Did Our Love Go?," another "Come See about Me," another "My World Is Empty without You," another "You Can't Hurry Love." And the one familiar number, the one unforgotten number, the big abandonment solo of former American Idol contestant Jennifer Hudson (big voice, big figure), screams out for earplugs if not a muzzle. Neither is it easy, evidently, to be another Aretha Franklin, Bevoncé Knowles looks glamorous enough as the Diana Ross diva who metamorphoses into disco queen Donna Summer (under the Svengalian guidance of the Berry Gordy stand-in, Jamie Foxx); and the period clothes and hairdos — something near a beehive on Eddie Murphy when we first meet him, higher and higher than Jackie Wilson are enjoyable as expected. 

Giant — Almost four hours long and as wide as a yawn, George Stevens's version of Edna Ferber's Texas epic is excessive in every way. By the finish, gray has dusted the black-shoe-polish hair of Rock Hudson, a limp empire-builder, and his little boy has grown up to be Dennis Hopper. James Dean lolls around in blue denims, smugly figuring his big innings will come sooner or later, and they do come, in the guise of snobby sunglasses and a trim mustache. All the while, Elizabeth Taylor behaves like the stout-hearted, unflinching Ferber-esque female ideal. Too much of the movie trudges along under the assumption that the gradual pileup of events, time, characters, and color will outweigh the vacuity of each individual moment, 1956.

The Good German — A nostalgist's film noir, one more black-and-white postwar thriller, over a half-century tardy in its arrival, for the buff who has run through Crossfire, Cornered, Notorious, The Stranger, Berlin Express, and Captain Carey, U.S.A., among numerous others, and who still has a hunger. Reassuring archaisms, such as the 4:3 aspect ratio for the opening credits (afterwards widened only to 1.66:1, it looks like) or the blatant rear-screen projection behind a stationary moving car, coexist uneasily with latter-day liberties in matters of sex and profanity. Steven Soderbergh, who had dabbled in black-and-white before (most of Kafka, most of his sequence in Eros, but never till now whole hog), knows where to place the low angles and inky shadows, though he doesn't know so well how to maintain pace and flow. George Clooney, who also had had black-andwhite experience in his self-directed Good Night, and Good Luck, fits right in, thanks to his "classical" movie-star good looks, scuffed up a bit in repeated beatings; and Cate Blanchett, as a Berlin prostitute with a presumed-dead but intensively sought husband, seems to be able to adapt herself to anything, including the German language with English subtitles. The Good Shepherd — Espionage epic, reasonably described by one blurbist as "*The Godfather* of CIA movies," but only if you are satisfied to retain all the pretentiousness of *The Godfather*, right down to the oppressive underillumination, and do without any of the enlivening pyrotechnics. (Despite those subtractions, the movie still comes to within ten minutes or so of *The Godfather*'s nearly three-hour duration.)

Tremendously unentertaining, it slogs back and forth in time, beginning with, and regularly returning to, the Bay of Pigs fiasco and fallout, but retreating back as far as the protagonist's college days as a Yalie and an inductee into the Skull and Bones secret society in 1939 (and even, in a psychoanalytical flashback-within-a-flashback, as far as his boyhood and his father's suicide in 1925), and then working its way forward toward 1961 in incremental jumps. Second-time director Robert De Niro, who also has a small sedentary role as the protagonist's espionage mentor, may have convinced himself that the back-and-forth time shuttle (not to mention the Cuban connection) would transform this also into The Godfather II of CIA movies. But this, unlike that, is a single-generation narrative, and the continual interruptions in the storytelling serve little other purpose than to thwart any suspense. And since the blockof-wood Matt Damon hardly ages a day in twenty-plus years (nor does Angelina Jolie in the unaccustomed role of a neglected wife), our best hope to avoid confusion as to where we are on the timeline is to differentiate between his many eyeglass frames. Happy Feet — Computer-animated message movie about the pressure of conformity and (separate message) the plunder of nature, more specifically about a species of pop-song-singing penguins, into whose midst is born a "different," an aberrant, tap-dancing penguin (try, if you can, to put the pudgy trudging birds of March of the Penguins out of your mind), and about a runtier breed of Latino penguins, some menacing seabirds, a scary seal, a couple of humongous orcas, and a race of "aliens who are not computer-animated at all. The interface with these aliens near the end is moderately mind-blowing, if only from a mixed-media standpoint, but the alleged alienness of the human race would carry more rhetorical clout if the penguins hadn't all along been borrowing so freely from its popular culture. (The natural state holds no accommodation for vintage rock-and-roll.) And you cannot feel entirely happy about a happy ending in which it's suggested that humans might show more respect for their fellow creatures on the planet if only the fellows would learn some nifty dance steps. Although the direction by live-action man George Miller has some nice touches and clever angles, the action, approximately 60mph faster than the action in his Mad Max movies, is approximately 65mph too fast. Hardcore science fiction meets psychological terror and giantmonster horror in the 1956 classic, Forbidden Planet. The first big-budget Technicolor sci-fi film, it set the bar for what sci-fi horror should be. It's actually a modern retelling of Shakespeare's The Tempest with Walter Pidgeon in the Prospero role. The first movie to use a Theremin for its soundtrack. The Id monster remained the most original creature until 1979's Alien.

It took over 50 years for the giant lizard to make it unedited and uncensored - to American shores. Chopped up to lose much of its anti A-Bomb theme for American audiences, Godzilla — still a powerful figure to behold — was sorely weakened by the addition of Raymond Burr walking through and narrating the entire flick. America had the first giant monster with King Kong, but while Kong was destroyed by New York City, Godzilla destroyed Tokyo. No giant-monster movie was ever more influential than the original Godzilla.

The Holiday — Writer and director Nancy Meyers arranges an Internet home exchange, for two weeks at Christmastime, between two wounded women desperate to get away: a London newspaper columnist (Kate Winslet) with a cozy cottage in Surrey, and a Hollywood trailer-cutter (Cameron Diaz) with a modernist mansion in Beverly Hills. The agreed-upon date of "tomorrow" initiates a pattern of time-compression that effectively removes the action from the realm of the real world. But then, Meyers does not seek to inhabit the


real world. Underneath her superficial smooth talk, she's really just a seductive dope peddler, chumming up to her susceptible sisters on the subject of romantic disillusionment, and then hooking them on the same old delusions — the grooved path, greased wheels, and phantom obstacles en route to Mr. Right. The film, at best, is a testament to the dearness of the dream. The sample of the trailer-cutter's work — an imaginary action thriller starring Lindsay Lohan and James Franco — is dead funny: the two stars running straight at the camera and away from a mushrooming fireball, the male star diving sideways in slo-mo with two guns blazing. But the fantasies wherein she sees her own life in terms of a movie trailer never really take flight. Meyers's affection for Golden Age Hollywood -

chiefly funnelled through the character of Eli Wallach as a widowed Oscar-winning screenwriter grumpily resisting a lifetime-achievement award from the WGA — is doubtless genuine, but our agreement with her must stop short of her persistent hints that she herself should be painted golden. Night at the Museum — Jumanji-esque jumble of special effects, in which all the exhibits at the Natural History Museum in New York City come to life after dark. This allows for a lot of, frankly an excess of, variety: Lilliputian cowboys and Roman soldiers who tie down the new night watchman like Gulliver; a mischievous monkey who pees on him, pickpockets his keys, and engages in a Three Stooges-style slapfest with him; a T-rex skeleton who wants to play fetch; a talking, bubblegum-chewing Easter Island head: Attila and some Huns: some lions, an elephant, a zebra, a rhino, and so on. It also allows for logical mix-ups whereby, for example, the wax figure of Teddy Roosevelt knows full well he's a wax figure of our twenty-sixth President, while the wax figure of Sakajawea is regarded as the actual, taxidermized Indian maid, a boon to the tour guide who is writing a dissertation on her. Director Shawn Levy oversees one decent cinematic moment, the contrasting views of the Lilliputians letting the air out of the tires of a van at the loading dock, an action which at close range looks as if they're trying to plug a hole in

the fuselage of a jetliner at 30,000 feet, while from a distance it looks as if all is calm. Mickey Rooney has a nice little role as a truculent security guard forced into retirement (addressing his replacement variously as "Hotshot," "Hopscotch," "Butterscotch," etc.), and Ricky Gervais, of the

Notes on a Scandal — Two thespian heavyweights, Cate Blanchett and Judi Dench, going toe to toe, battling to a draw. The scandal, as it comes to light, is the illicit and illegal affair of a married-with-children, thirty-something art teacher, Blanchett, and a fifteen-year-old male student (Andrew Simpson), a ripped-fromthe-headlines affair made perfectly plausi-ble if not comprehensible. What doesn't come fully to light, except to the voyeuristic viewer, is how a self-deluding lonely old lesbian history teacher, Dench, attempts to use her knowledge of the affair to her own advantage, again perfectly plausible if not exactly politically correct. Both of the women are individuals, not representatives, and they're played that way. The drama gets a bit overwrought toward the finish, and Philip Glass's phone-it-in musical score is no asset, but all in all a compelling effort. Pan's Labyrinth — Guillermo del Toro. the migrant Mexican filmmaker, returns to the place and time of his Spanish Civil War ghost story, The Devil's Backbone, more precisely post-Civil War, mid-WWII. He centers on a preadolescent girl (wide-eyed, plump-lipped Ivana Baquero) chided by

her nine-months-pregnant mother (Ariadna Gil, very intense) as too old to be still filling her head with the "nonsense" of fairy tales, especially since she has moved beneath the roof of her wicked stepfather (Sergi López, campily over the top), a Francoist martinet busily stamping out rebels in the woods, who has little tolerance for a child of another bloodline but is eager to get his leather-sheathed hands on his biological baby in his wife's womb. Much more welcoming of the little girl is the mythological faun (real or imagined?), the guardian of the off-limits garden, who identifies the newcomer straight off as the prodigal daughter of the King of the Underworld (what are the odds?). Del Toro, almost in spite of himself, is not altogether

guiltless of conventional, parental, puritanical strictures against fairy tales. In his scrupulous, perhaps overscrupulous, balance of dark fantasy and brutal history, tilted (politically, diplomatically) a little toward the latter, he leaves nothing to chance. He establishes the Importance of his theme through the unassailable realm of Fascists and freedom fighters, and he connects that world to the parallel universe of fairy tales in a way that can best be termed didactic, academic, studied, possibly stifling. He makes a case. He does not make magic. Far more than The Devil's Backbone, the film that keeps coming to mind, always to this one's disadvantage, is Victor Erice's Spirit of the Beehive, 1973. That one, having in common a post-Civil War backdrop and a

gullible little girl, made very much the same points, together with others, and made them more subtly, more ambiguously, more poetically; made them, moreover, while Franco was still in power; and made them without recourse to special effects beyond a Halloween get-up of Frankenstein's monster. Del Toro never lets his special effects here, some of them pretty tacky and icky, take over to the same extent as in his comic-book Hollywood movies (Blade II, *Hellboy*), but a mere black-gloved sadist, even with an open gash on his cheek, has a hard time holding his own against an arboreal goat-god, an insectile pixie, a featureless humanoid with eyes in the palms of his hands, an obscene giant toad, a Tim Burton-esque airless sunless tangled landscape.



The plentiful humor, out of deference to history and living persons, is very mild, 2006.

Skill vs. Will, it's billed as, and no chance to mistake which is which. By rights, of course, Stallone ought to have taken over the Burgess Meredith role and left the fighting to, say, Hilary Swank. The glaring irony of it is that, while the on-screen Stallone is supposed to be the personification of heart and desire, the off-screen Stallone can only have been motivated by the thing that motivates his on-screen opponent and supposed opposite: lust for a big payday. 





Raro manjar

La abundante cosecha de arroz en la provincia de Battambang va paralela al lucrativo negocio del consumo de ratas de arrozal, que sigue siendo uno de los manjares más apreciados en el norte de Camboya.

El origen de tan peculiar costumbre gastronómica data de la época de terror instaurada por el Jemer Rojo (1975-1979), cuando unos dos millones de camboyanos murieron a causa de las hambrunas y de las ejecuciones del grupo ultra-maoísta.

De esa represión no se libraron los residentes de Battambang, en plena zona de arrozales del país, a los que el hambre obligó a alimentarse de las ratas arroceras, convirtiéndose así en su principal fuente de proteínas. Treinta años después de la caída de ese régimen prevalece en Battambang el gusto por esa comida tan poca común, ya sea preparada en barbacoa con salsa dulce, asada en hierbas aromáticas o en una suculenta sopa.

Además, los restaurantes que sirven ese plato especial acogen bien la época de ratas de arrozal, ya que para ellos significa una importante fuente de ingresos.

Un propietario de un restaurante manifesto que la voracidad de su clientela es tal que vende más de 10 kilos de carne de rata al día. Y es que la gente que ingiere este tipo de roedores no los ve como algo repelente y sucio, como podrian ser las ratas de alcantarilla.

LEAD STORY

- Eventually, robots will have to be given legal rights and accept certain responsibilities if advances in artificial intelligence (AI) continue to create sensitive quasi-organisms, according to a paper solicited for Sir David King, the UK's chief scientist. According to one AI researcher, "If [robots are] granted full rights, states will be obligated to provide full social benefits to them including income support, housing, and possibly robo-healthcare to fix the machines over time." A December Financial Times report on the paper noted that robots might also have to pay taxes and be available for military service. Some of the ideas in the paper track visions described years ago by writer Isaac Asimov.

Government in Action!

 Many voters and critics in both parties chided the "do-nothing" 109th Congress (2005-2006) as a body tied up in partisanship and divisiveness. However, the Congress passed 383 pieces of legislation, except that almost 100 of those laws were merely authorizations to name post offices and other federal structures after famous Americans (such as Ray Charles, Ava Gardner and Karl Malden).

 Politicians in the German states of Lower Saxony and Bavaria proposed in December to criminalize "cruel" violent acts in video games when they are directed at "humans" or "human-looking characters." Bavarian interior minister Gunther Beckstein pointed to a November incident in which an 18-year-old player of the violent game "Counter Strike" went to a school, shot 37 people, and then killed himself.

 Following a military coup in November, Fiji's army chief Frank Bainimarama took over and placed classified ads in local newspapers to seek candidates to be ministers and senior civil servants. The minimum qualifications: no criminal record and not to be bankrupt. And Nigeria's People's Democratic Party started screening candidates in December to run for president this year, ranking applicants on the following criteria: patriotism (10 percent), integrity (15), ethnic neutrality (10),

knowledge of law (10), tolerance (5), transparency (10), knowledge of development (10) and leadership qualities (15).

- From the Arizona Daily Sun (Flagstaff, Ariz., 12-3-06): "About 1800 square feet of insulation were reported stolen from the underside of a house on the 5100 block of East Hickory Drive. The victim said the insulation disappeared sometime between September and this week. She said she was having trouble keeping her house warm as the weather got colder.

— Oops: John Beacham of the Anti-War Coalition in Chicago said he has suspected for a while that police had been spying on his organization, but he was obviously proved wrong when the coalition canceled, well in advance, a planned Oct. 28 demonstration downtown. Unaware of the cancellation, hundreds of police officers lined the streets around the protest area, hoping to prevent the recurrence of a wild demonstration in 2003. Deputy police superintendent Charles Williams blamed the coalition for not keeping the department informed.

Cliches Come to Life

- The Texas Ethics Commission ruled in November that a public official in the Lone Star state, receiving money as a gift such as from a lobbyist, need disclose only that he received "a check" or "currency" and need not reveal the amount of money. Said the district attorney in Austin, who was outraged by the ruling, it is now "perfectly legal to report the gift of 'a wheelbarrow' without reporting that the wheelbarrow was filled with cash."

Bright Ideas

— Scamming the Horny Panda: One trick that zookeepers have used to get male pandas interested in mating with dowdier females (according to a December dispatch from Sichuan, China, in Australia's The Age) is to let an attractive female roam around a pen, leaving her scent, and then, in darkness, with the male in the pen and frisky at the scent, to introduce the less attractive female

into the pen, back-end first, so that the preexcited male will quickly begin copulating. Said zookeeper Zhang Hemin, "When the males find out [that they've just mated with unintended partners], they get very angry and start fighting the female. We have had to use firecrackers and a water hose to separate them.'

· Rules! (1) Sixty years after Indiana abolished gambling and wrecked the economy of the resort town of French Lick, the state brought it back, allowing casinos, but they had to be located on water and not the state's dry land. Developers of the French Lick Springs Resort thus spent \$382 million on a plush "riverboat" casino on a manmade lake barely larger than the boat, and it opened in November. (2) Derek Ogley, 70, had just been discharged from Tameside General Hospital in Ashton, England, in November, but doubled over in pain in the waiting room. (He was eventually diagnosed with pancreatitis.) Nurses informed Ogley's family they would have to call 999 (the UK's 911) or drive him around to the emergency entrance about three minutes away, because, since he had been discharged, rules prevented them from treating him.

Crème de la Weird

- People Disrespecting Their Bodies: John Sheehan, 33, was arrested in November, nude, near the rapid-transit station in El Cerrito, Calif., and when asked if he was carrying contraband, admitted that he had a "screwdriver" in his rectum. Police treated the item as a potential weapon, training guns on him while he removed the 6-inch-long 'awl" wrapped in electrical tape. ... A week later, in Monkwearmouth, England, a 22-year-old Iraq-war veteran told buddies he was bored and, imitating a prank from a Jackass movie, inserted a firework "up his backside," according to a Daily Mail story, and lit it. When it exploded, he was taken to Sunderland Royal Hospital with a scorched colon and other serious injuries.



At one time I was one of them, but I have long since become a thin-blooded weakling who senses the onset of Snow Moon, Wolf Moon, and Hunger Moon with an array of hypochondriacal symptoms that would render Felix Unger absolutely Schwarzenegger-like.

As I clicked on the "Place Your Order" button, having once again spent more money on Amazon than I make in a week, I realized I didn't care. Because I am getting books. Deliciously bad books, the reviews say. If I end up destitute, selling potatoes roasted in a rusty barrel, it will not matter, because I will be the most obnoxiously well-read roasted potato vendor in Beijing, and all anyone wants out of life is a little originality.

This was an Internet-driven downward spiral, wherein I started out looking at *Listology.com*, or whatever it's called, and found a list entitled "1001 Books You Should Read Before You Die," which was translated in my feeble mind as "1001 Books That You Have to Order Right Fucking Now, Because You Could Get Hit by a Bus Tomorrow Morning, And You'll Be Bored in the Hospital, So Go Get the Goddamn Debit Card, Kendra."

Among a Mongol horde of other things, I ordered Sexing the Cherry immediately after reading the review. Especially the part where it said, "But the novel's freakish characters and flights of surreal fancy are insufficient to redeem its overwrought artifice. The work is further limited by its stridently dogmatic feminism, which, contemptuously belittling all men as arrogantly stupid bullies who are vastly women's inferiors in maturity and moral fiber, vitiates its ostensible intent to transcend the narrowness of human perception."

tional postal service. But after handing out various, poignantly highlighted pages as Spring Festival presents (oh, sweet, sweet revenge), I was totally out of rabid prose.

There's a couple of English-language bookstores around town, so just when you think you can't possibly sink any lower, you can sidle in there and buy romance novels and financial how-to books that you stuff into a brown paper bag while shooting furtive, guilty looks at the cashier. This invariably leads to one of two gradual adjustments in attitude: inyour-face belligerence about reading this stuff in public or buying academic treatises to serve as a sort of mortification-deflecting book jacket for all the smut you're guzzling.

You start thinking things like, "Is Gortavia going to bend Heraldus to her will with her grandmother's hypnotic topaz heirloom in the next chapter or do I have to wait another 40 pages for them to ravish each other?" Torture increases victims' pain tolerance, studies show.

Oh, what, you'd never touch that filth? Goody. You're in for great titles like, Thirty-Two Great Investment Options for the Aging Spa Owner, Recycle Your Recycled Recyclables! and Interviews from the Throat: China's Top Cough-Syrup Tycoons Tell It Like It Is. Knock yourself out.

Before you can say "hypocrite," you will be hiding a Danielle Steel cocooned within White Papers of the Chinese Government and protecting it like it's a kitten with a broken leg. Two broken legs. Because the second you let that cute European dude at the taxi stand read the back cover, he's sprinting off down Jianguomen Outer Street waving it over his head

Anyway, I'd like to avoid making a huge advertisement about Amazon. But I can't. They're awesome. And until you've had a haggard old woman wrapped in a People's Army greatcoat deliver you a package of Irvine Welsh in the middle of Siberian winter, you're categorically unqualified to talk about it.

Now, listen closely, because you'll never, ever hear me say this again: sometimes I hate the Internet. I







Rafter is a San Diego legend, crafting his music intertwined with the good people of SD for years. If you don't know Rafter, you probably know one of the projects he's worked on or starred in. They include so many notable San Diegan and national acts that it's impossible to do justice with a list, but here goes: Black Heart Procession, Castanets, Maquiladora, Bunky, Suftjan Stevens, The Fiery Furnaces, etc...

My shorthand interpretation of Rafter's SD story goes like this: Rafter moves down to SD to start working on some jingles with that fella from Trumans Water, Glen Galloway (who fronts his own amazing thing now called Soul-Junk). I guess Glen had a list of corporate contacts and Rafter had the sounds, and they banded together to form Singing Serpent. As it says in Rafter's bio for this disc, if you've seen the last few Olympics or Super Bowls, you've heard his music

They moved into a studio downtown by City College and got the Singing Serpent studios going, hiring all sorts of good people and

creating all kinds of things that hard work blessed with the right alchemy can create, and started doing lots of ads. All the while, he was working on recording, mixing, and mastering the best of SD's music scene at night.



Rafter started Bunky with Emily Joyce, did a bunch of albums and shows. They sold their building downtown and relocated Singing Serpent to another SD locale, where they create magic still. Forgive my haziness, for I only know some things for sure. I'm around, but not necessarily down.

There's something about Rafter's good karma that has helped to propel him to these lofty heights. It's my feeling that in the indie music scene, the more you do for others, the more comes

back to you. No one else is going to help you push your underground, twisted music venture into something more than your personal dream, except for the other indie players who can vouch for and give credibility and exper-

> tise to your projects. Almost no one in this town has the reputation for giving that Rafter has. He loans out equipment, offers advice on the phone, masters records, helps with composition. mixes tracks, and sits with songs to find their true sounds. He helps the artist to better understand what it is that they do and to articulate that truth.

This album does something I've not yet heard from Rafter. This album pushes the instrumentation and song structure deep into short songs, packed densely with many different sounds.... You hear many other artists in there, like Radiohead and Mogwai. The longest song on the disc is a 4:03 track called "Boy," which incorporates many of the ideas into one piece. You get some Beatles sounds, some whacked-out drums, distorted instrumentation, and then a slide into one of the most beautiful outs available today.

I sit down. Talk. Let her talk; Lord knows she needs to talk. Listen. I'm charming and social until she can't take it anymore. She needs a fix, and I can see it, not in her eyes, but in her neck. She scratches at the red throbbing veins. If I'm nice enough, she'll invite me back to her place to get high.

In her apartment, she shows me the painting she's been doing on her TV. "These red dots line up with someone's eyes, or the sun, or a pair of car tires, in every show," she says. The red dots are two spots in a series of hundreds of colors crawling across the screen and over the back of the set. I believe her and think the art she's done on her television is a brilliant use of an otherwise worthless fixture.

We smoke from a glass pipe, and I'm happy. I'm in a stranger's apartment, but in the embrace of my lost love.

It was a recent Friday night in Normal Heights and University Heights, each to either side of my address on Adams; I'm not sure in which I reside. My son was visiting for the weekend. When he is down from his place in San Marcos, he likes the coffee shops and laptop computers; the acoustic guitar acts at Lestat's and Twiggs. He likes to peoplewatch and to surround himself with those his approximate age and the atmosphere of Bohemia, such as it is in these neighborhoods. On this particular Friday night, Steve Poltz was playing at Lestat's West; and since Geoffrey's smile is these days so rare and, to me, priceless, I thought certainly Poltz could evoke one or more from him. If anyone, that local troubadour and stand-up raconteur could breach my son's schiz-affect barricades.

But Poltz would not go on until late. Geoff and I drank coffee (me, a small one with an espresso shot, and for him, an imposing vat of white vanilla mocha something or other); studied an artist at work, a Mr. Brown, busy rendering much life from a black-and-white photo of a beautiful woman onto a white sheet with a charcoal pencil; and Geoffrey took a few photos of myself and local performer Gregory Page. Page and I had both played with the same band at different times.

We walked an estimated four miles that night, all before nine o'clock. Adams was alternately boisterous in front of the bars (and Lestat's at times) and swallowed in silent, secret shadows

populated (as we had done when Geoff was very young) with impossible creatures of fantasy, both friendly and horrid. Those walks in his childhood were through alleys in Hillcrest we called either Danger Alley or Adventure Alley and happened to be directly on his way to Florence Elementary. One alley was a seething obstacle course of acid lakes disguised as mud puddles, where dinosaurs lurked; the other was an earthquake planet just lousy with malevolent Go-bots.

On that Friday night, Christmas lights were in evidence everywhere, especially along Park Boulevard, beneath the watchful eye of totem ostriches like gargoyles atop the neon-lit trolley car and arch that reads UNIVERSITY HEIGHTS. I told him that his great-great grandfather was kicked to death by an ostrich as he attempted to offload the bird from a zoo's boxcar in a Chicago railyard. His reaction was, "Mmm..." It was a true story, as far as I know, but I was pretty sure Poltz had better material.

Electric snowflakes, detonations of multicolored points of light like eruptions of cartoon ghosts from the neon shadows, as if they had just been bonked on the head by a sledgehammer, an anvil, or a safe that has fallen on them from above. Among all this, my son stops in his tracks, his head to the stars, and I mumble about city lights and, "...not like up where you are. There's Polaris. You see the handle on the dipper? The archer's bow...

'Hmmm…cool."

And Poltz did have better material. Playing to a packed house, he got laughs aplenty, and his guitar seemed alive. At one point in the show, he stopped, donned a pair of old-guy reading glasses (Poltz is maybe 40, I don't know, but boyish, you know, boyish), and read a piece of the late Buddy "Blue" Seigel's from April of last year in the *U-T*, in which Siegel had written "Fight Club: Matches Made in Rock and Roll Heaven" and gave a blow-by-blow re imaginary bouts between Gene Vincent and Elvis, Pat Boone and Little Richard, and the Beatles and the Stones. The house, already packed, then "packed up" as they say in South Africa when describing fits of laughter. Geoff may have smiled. When Poltz asked the audience if we were feeling good, Geoffrey was the first to applaud but with the expression of a bank loan officer reading my credit report.

I sat with a face like setting cement through a song about a Marine in Iraq, called "Street Fighter's Face." My son's face was a mirror. The sentiment-laden "A Brief History of My Life" had me sappily grinning like a constipated geezer at the moment of relief. I knew all the sportscasters he sang about, and I thought about how Poltz and I are so much alike. Steve delivered newspapers — or maybe it was trick-or-treating he was talking about — to Liberace in Las Vegas. I delivered papers and trick-or-treated at Tony (the gangster) Acardo's house in Chicago. Steve played at Java Joe's in Ocean Beach with Jewel, and I played there with Jose Sinatra.

Returning home along Adams Avenue, me huddling in a scarf against unusual cold after a day of record-setting heat and Geoff in calflength denims and a T-shirt, we talked about the nature of perception, consensual reality, and things along those lines. After midnight, we watched Keanu Reeves in Little Buddha; Geoffrey impassive. me, looking at Geoffrey much — the kind of thing I hate when it is done to me.



The next day, Saturday, my son seemed again impassive and wished to return to San Marcos. When asked if he had enjoyed himself, he said yes and sat on the porch staring into an evergreen pear tree in the courtyard. When his mother arrived, he turned to me and, unsolicited, said, "I liked that buddha movie." I am certain I saw a trace of the Mona Lisa kind of expression Keanu Reeves had mastered in that movie as he sat beneath the bodhi tree and all of Chaos raged around him.

"Well, good, Grasshopper. Or should I call you Siddhartha?" And, yes, now I was extra certain it was there.
