



Interesting interests When ex-Democratic state senator Steve Peace and county supervisor Ron Roberts rolled out their futuristic vision for a remade downtown waterfront two weeks



ago, regional airport board chairman Alan Bersin was sitting in the front row. Called upon to speak, Bersin, the former San Diego Unified School District chief and ex-education secretary to Governor Schwarzenegger, lent some tentative words of support to

Alan Bersin the nascent proposal, which

among other things suggests the possibility of digging a canal for a water taxi to shuttle air passengers downtown and building a "people mover" to Balboa Park. But based on a recently filed financial disclosure, Bersin has another reason besides his role on the airport board to be concerned about the future of the central city, namely millions of dollars of downtown real estate that his wife Lisa Foster, daughter of the late property mogul Stan Foster, has a stake in. "Lisa Foster owns a 22 percent membership interest in the Foster-Downtown Group, LLC," says Bersin's disclosure report, filed with the airport authority January 29. "The Foster-Downtown Group, LLC owns a 70 percent membership interest in OMF, LLC. OMF, LLC owns a 100 percent membership interest in the following entities, which own the real property listed." Ten addresses are given: 655 Sixth Avenue, 677 Seventh, 707 Tenth, 1122 G, 1229 G, 645 12th, 639 13th, 1248 Market, 643-675 G, and 722 Market. The filing values the holdings at "over \$1,000,000," the maximum disclosure level required by law; it says gross income received is between \$10,000 and \$100,000. Last year, OMFOSTER, LLC, a company that records show is run by the Foster family, was listed as giving \$22,500 to the pro-privatization campaign of San Diego mayor Jerry Sanders, who appointed Bersin to the airport board in November.

Big bundles Election time is over for now, but San Diego Eighth District city councilman Ben Hueso has continued to spend some profitable time out on the political fund-raising circuit, where corporate contributions are banned



Slam the Door on "Foreclosure **Consultant**"

f you're like a record number of San Diegans, you're having an anxiety attack: you've got a mortgage you can't afford, and higher home prices won't bail you out. Save wants to help you avoid foreyourself additional angst: if closure. Chances are, he wants you get a cold call from someto relieve you of your money or even

"People will be contacting

you saying, 'I know how to get you out of foreclosure,' "

says Sheryl Charleston, president of the San Diego Better Business Bureau. "These guys will collect money from the consumers, who then find out that they are going to lose their homes."

Notices of default and possible foreclosures are a matter of public record that are printed in some newspapers. "They're a shopping list for the crooks," says Stephen Robinson, head of the economic crimes unit of the district attorney's office. "The crooks determine which homes have equity in them and start coldcalling. One of my pieces of advice is if you get a cold call, you probably don't want to do business with them."

"We are hearing that the increases in foreclosures will take a giant spike, and we are trying to get the word out that we will take action against people who violate the equityskimming laws or the foreclosure consultant laws," says Al Shelden, senior assistant state attorney general, who is based in San Diego. "It's conceivable there could be criminal penalties, civil penalties, restitution to consumers."

Already, there has been a spike. According to DataQuick Information Systems, foreclosures in the county zoomed last year to 1612 from a mere continued on page 8

Rape Was Just the Beginning

et's say you're a single mom in your mid-30s. You've recently taken your 2-year-old son and 12-year-old dog and moved away

from your husband. The divorce is ugly, and your job search is tough. You'd like to move back in with your parents in Illinois, but the court says that taking your son out of California would be considered kidnapping until the divorce is final. You find an apartment in what seems like a good neighborhood in Ocean Beach. You sign a six-month lease and pay \$1050 for the first month's rent and \$1300 for the deposit. But within a week of moving in, you complain to police that the excon who lives in the building has raped you in your own apartment while your son slept nearby. I'm sure you're thinking it couldn't get much worse. But it does. Despite your pleas, despite letters from a police detective, social workers, and your psychologist, the apartment manager won't release you from your lease or refund your deposit.

According to a police report, this is what happened to 37-year-old Karen Howes last fall while she rented at from Dusty Rhodes Dog Park, and really close to Dog Beach. And I love the ocean. The building wasn't so nice, but hey, I have a dog and I have a kid."

Howes's father, who had flown in from Chicago, helped her move on October 27, 2006. "I moved into apartment 107, which is right by the office."

In a nearby apartment lived a 28-year-old man with prior convictions for theft, possession of stolen property, and possession of methamphetamine. Howes did not know about her neighbor's criminal past when she met him two or three days after moving in. "I had snuck out one night," she recalls, "because my dad was driving me crazy and I wanted to smoke a cigarette. So I was outside, and I ran into [the neighbor], and we had a chat. He was really forward with me, and I told him, 'No, I am completely not interested.' I told him straight-out, 'I am in the middle of a nasty divorce. I'm totally not interested in any

been damaged during the move. One night, he knocked on her door and asked her and her son to come watch the movie *Over the Hedge* at his house. "He gets my kid completely worked up on the idea, so I said, 'All right, we will come down and watch *Over the Hedge*.' So I left my dad in my apartment, and we went and watched half of it, and we came back. I told my dad, 'This guy is really a creep. He is really nervous and jumpy.'

"I put my dad on a plane on Halloween. Next day, November 1, I drop my kid at day care, and I'm out running errands. I came back to the apartment at about 3:30 with a million bags. I walk up to my door with four or five large bags and five more still in the car, and [the neighbor] is standing at my door. I asked, 'What are you doing here?' 'Oh, I've been looking for you all day. Let me help you with those bags.''No, I'm fine.''No, no, I insist.' 'No, I can get it.' He's not taking no for an answer, and he keeps following me. I told him I had to walk my dog, and he says, 'Well, I'm coming with you.' He smelled a little boozie; it was clear he'd been drinking. I said, 'No, thanks. I'll walk my own dog.' But he grabs my dog and starts walking a million miles a minute. And I am running after him in heels, yelling, 'Give me my dog. I will walk my dog.' '



in my apartment. He goes to his apartment and is back at my door in a minute, and he has one of these big 32-ouncers of beer. I said, 'I am going says she was back in her apartment eating Pick Up Stix with her son when the neighbor knocked on the door. "He seems completely normal,

I didn't call the police because my son was there and I didn't think anything would be done. I couldn't believe what had just happened and I was disgusted. I didn't know who to call so I called my ex-husband and told him what happened. He said he was going to call the police. I told him, "No" and that I would deal with it. I went to sleep.

I felt really gross and sick all day and I took maybe ten showers. I later decided to come to the police station to report what happened.

the Nimitz Pointe apartments at 2401 Seaside, just off Nimitz Boulevard near the west end of Interstate 8. Howes found Nimitz Pointe after an apartment search she describes as "extremely difficult because I have a two-year-old and a rottweiler-mix dog."

Nimitz Pointe seemed like an answer to Howes's prayers. "It was close to my son's day care, right across the street romantic relationship, absolutely not."

After meeting her neighbor, Howes says, "I'm trying to avoid him, but he keeps knocking on my door. He comes and meets my dad one day. He is on me like white on rice. Every time I turn around, the guy is right there."

Howes mentioned to the man during their first conversation that her TV had

Howes says he walked her dog several blocks to Collier Park and stopped at a bench. She caught up and sat down on the bench, at which point the man, she says, "tries to kiss me. I said, 'No!' And he said, 'Okay, it is totally cool. I completely understand,' and he backed off. I said, 'I have to take my dog home. I have to get my kid.' So he walks me home, and I put my dog back to get my kid,' and he asked, 'When are you going to be back?' "

Despite her neighbor's unwanted advances and attentions, Howes didn't consider calling the police. "I just thought he was a big flake. And when I told him no, he immediately backed off. And the last thing I wanted was more problems."

At 6:30 that evening, Howes


really calmed down. And he said, 'Just came over to see if your son wants to watch the rest of the movie.' I said, 'No, I don't think that is the best idea.' He said, 'Come on,' and my son is yelling that he wants to watch the movie. So I said, 'Okay,' and we watched the rest of the movie."

When the movie ended, Howes says, she took her son back to her apartment to put Nimitz Pointe apartments

him to bed. Her neighbor asked if he could come and see if he could fix her TV. Once the child was asleep, Howes stepped outside into the hall to smoke a cigarette and drink a beer. The man, also having a beer, came with her. "Everything seemed really calm," she recalls, "but pretty soon he starts hitting on me again, and I said, 'No, absolutely not."

Howes told police what happened next. "I went into my bedroom about 10:00 p.m.," the police crime report quotes Howes. "[The neighbor] followed me into my bedroom and started touching my breasts, stomach, and crotch. I told him, 'No!' Then he pushed me 🖉 down on the bed. 212 in 2005. Notices of default, early steps preceding foreclosures, more than doubled from 3933 to 8816.

So what are these scams? The so-called "foreclosure rescue" scam takes many forms. Recently, "most of the local cases were the straightforward cons where the crook promises to negotiate with the homeowner's lender in exchange for one month's mortgage payment. Typically, the crook takes the money and runs," says Robinson.

Or homeowners may be conned into letting the foreclosure "rescuer" take over the mortgage payments. "When somebody says, 'I will take over your payments,' it almost always ends in disaster," says Shelden.

In some cases, the slick operator says he can save the residence from foreclosure if the homeowner will turn over the title to him for a year or two. During the interim, the homeowner can live in the house and pay rent. But often, unknown to the homeowner, the house is sold to an investor; the equity is stripped out, and the homeowner is evicted.

Then there are "mortgage elimination" scams. The strapped homeowner is told he can pay off the mortgage quickly by altering the payment terms. Some people are even told they can pay off a 30-year mortgage in 7 months.

The scamsters may claim there are loopholes in the original mortgage that make it invalid. Often these swindles are pulled by fringe groups that believe the Federal Reserve System is illegal; therefore, the money the bank advanced to the borrower wasn't real money; ergo, the loan doesn't have to be paid back. Over and over, courts have rejected this specious argument.

A classic case is the Dorean Group of Oakland. Its two founders — one of whom had gone to the slammer in the 1990s for securities fraud claimed they had erased 1000 mortgages around the country. One of their Internet sales pitches featured an audio clip questioning the legitimacy of the Federal Reserve. The Better Business Bureau, including the San Diego branch, warned of this one early.

Says Shelden, "Don't sign with a person who knocks on your door the same day he knocks without doing a lot of checking. He might have to be registered with the Department of Real Estate. Explore what other loan products are out there." For example, there may be legitimate ways that you can get a loan you can handle — say, with a longer maturity.

Most of all, "Go talk with your lender to see what the lender is willing to do," says Shelden.

Stan Sexton of New Horizons Realty in La Mesa notes that one alternative to foreclosure is the short sale. In such a case, the lender agrees to accept less than the amount due. There is also the deed in lieu of foreclosure, by which the borrower turns over the property to the lender without any foreclosure proceedings. Both sides must enter into the transaction voluntarily and in good faith.

Thus far, the foreclosure statistics, despite their sharp rise, are lower than economists expected. Therefore, some say the housing woes are coming to an end. But, says Saxton, "Deeds in lieu of foreclosure and short sales are big," and the optimism may be unwarranted.

Attorney Mark L. Miller is seeing some deeds in lieu of foreclosure and short sales but not as many as could be expected. The industry "is still in denial. Mortgage companies keep coming up with toxic loans" that will eventually increase foreclosures, he says. He is seeing people in trouble grabbing 50-year loans. "I'm the doctor. People want me to fix their mortgages. But bankruptcy is the answer," and bankruptcies are going up sharply.





man's body. "I knew he had tattoos on his arms and shoulders, but everybody in California has them, and they were pretty, and colorful. Well, his shirt comes off, and I see 'DAGO' across the stomach and a swastika dead center above his dick. And it is green and nasty."

The police report confirms Howes's observation. In a box titled "further suspect description," the police list a tattoo "DAGO" — a street-slang word meaning San Diego on the stomach and a swastika on the pelvis.

After taking a shower, Howes called her husband "and started yelling at him about what had happened. And he called the police."

Howes talked to the police by phone that night and went to the police station the next day, where she underwent a postrape examination she describes as "an ordeal." Next came the question of where to live. She knew she didn't want to stay at Nimitz Pointe any longer, and the police detective, social worker, and psychologist she was working with agreed. Living in motels was at the time financially impossible for Howes, so she moved back into her husband's Clairemont apartment. In the meantime, Howes says she called, visited, and wrote to Vonetta Young, Nimitz Pointe's property manager, and asked to be released from her lease. "I told her I couldn't be there. I had lived there all of four days. I told her I wanted her to release me from the lease, that she needed to release me from the lease. She said, 'I can't release you from the lease, but I will try to rerent it. I will start showing it

immediately.' "

The apartment still hasn't been rerented, Howes says, and she hasn't been refunded. Without the return of her \$2350 in rent and deposit, and with an open lease on her credit, finding another apartment was impossible. In a letter dated November 7, 2006, Philip Worts, the San Diego police detective assigned to Howes's case, wrote to Young stating that the department was "actively investigating a felony criminal assault complaint wherein the victim, Karen Howes, is now a possible target of stalking, kidnapping, or additional assault.... She requested of me a letter of information in order to provide a reasonable basis...to release her from her contractual obligations."

His letter had no effect, Howes says. Young would not release her from the lease. The same day, Howes's psychologist, Susan D. Sharpe, wrote a letter to Young."Karen Howes is a patient of mine," Sharpe wrote, "who is clearly suffering from trauma that is directly related to a sexual assault perpetrated on her by another tenant on November 1, 2006 at Nimitz Pointe complex. For the purpose of her personal safety and emotional well-being, it is strongly recommended that she immediately move from these premises."

Sharpe's letter had no effect, Howes says. On November 8, Cynthia Forsythe, a victim's advocate with the district attorney's office, wrote to Young "to provide documentation that Ms. Karen L. Howes is a crime victim.... Ms. Howes was assaulted by a neighbor who lives...in the same apartment complex. Since the case is currently

CITY LIGHTS under investigation, it is imperative that she remove herself

from this situation as soon as possible. Any assistance you could possibly provide her would be most appreciated during this most emotional time."

On November 9, Nina Verdugo, a court-appointed psychosocial rehabilitation specialist assigned to Howes as part of her divorce court proceedings, wrote to Young that Howes "experienced a violent crime against her at her current residence. This is a highly stressful living situation for herself and her child. It is my recommendation that she obtain alternative housing for her safety and overall wellbeing."

And on December 14, Jessica Enriquez, a sexual assault response team advocate with the Center for Community Solutions, wrote to Young, "During this painful process, my client has been intimidated and harassed by her neighbor on numerous occasions, producing an environment that she perceived as dangerous for herself and for her son. My client vacated the premises for no other reason than to ameliorate her physical, mental, and emotional well-being and would not have had to resort to such drastic measures in any other situation.... While I understand that the contractual obligations between the property management company and the tenant are binding, I believe that the assault that occurred on the premises constitutes extenuating circumstances."

Despite these letters from Worts, Sharpe, Forsythe, Verdugo, and Enriquez, Young to date has not released Howes from her lease. Howes and her son spent a 28-day emergency stay in a battered women's shelter and are now living in motels while they wait for an opening at a different facility. "I told Vonetta we would have to move into a shelter if she didn't release me and refund the rent and deposit," Howes said. "But she will not release me or return the funds."

Vonetta Young did not return phone calls. Howes's former neighbor and the woman he was living with have moved out of Nimitz Pointe. He didn't return phone calls. The case is still under investigation.

The County Should Step Up

Thank you to the Reader and Joe Deegan for his story on the San Diego city lakes ("Turnstiles for Lake Murray?" "City Lights," February 8). As a resident of the city of San Diego for all of my 60 years, including 30 years as manager of the San Diego City Lakes Program, I sincerely believe it to be one of this region's greatest assets and most significant public resources.

Just as importantly, it, along with the city's golf courses, is one of the few municipal programs with the design and capability for users to pay most if not all of their way.

Inasmuch as the city's reservoir system serves the entire county, and has done so for nearly a century, it would behoove our regional leaders - maybe even the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) — to help the City of San Diego dig out of this portion of the much larger hole it has dug for itself in terms of its operations and finances.

Considering that only three of the city's ten reservoirs are within its city limits and that six are contiguous to, or regionally important to, other municipalities (Chula Vista, La Mesa, El Cajon, and Escondido), it should not be beyond reason to hope that somewhere in this region there is sufficient political leadership and cooperation to easily resolve the program's relatively small financial difficulties. To do so now would be even more important for this region's future than its present.

Over the years, the San Diego City Lakes Program has been used as a model by local agencies and governments from throughout the nation hoping to duplicate in some fashion the outstanding program we have had here for nearly a century.

The same can be said for governmental delegations from Portugal, South Africa, Mexico, Japan, and South Korea — all of whom hoped to replicate San Diego's model of providing public benefit as a result of access to water-supply reservoirs. Could the leaders in this

region somehow develop an appreciation for what this program means to our residents, visitors, and related business community?

Could they find some of the vision for public benefit shown by other leaders in this country and around the world?

Let's hope so, before it is too late.



Hi, Matthew:

Concerning those heart-wrenching lost dog or cat flyers distraught humans post advertising a reward for the returned pet: do they create a contract? If you were to find and return the beloved pet, and the humans refused to pay the posted reward, could the finder sue in small claims court? If the finder refused to hand over the beloved pet unless the reward were paid, is that a criminal offense?

In spirit, a flyer on a phone pole is more like a hooker on the stroll. Not yet a contract, but with a promising future. A legal contract involves Competent Person A offering something of value, and Competent Person B offering something of value in return. The return of a cute pooch to its owner and a reward for the return of the cute pooch will do nicely. So, say you read the reward flyer and later find cute pooch under your porch. You take cute pooch to the person offering the reward. "Here's your pooch! What a peach! He was under my porch. Gimme the reward." A contract is born.

Dog-loser is happy to see cute pooch. "Hey, Jack, you're back! What a break. Well, take a hike, hick. A reward? That was a joke." A contract is breached.

Legally, you can now take cute pooch and put him back under the porch; though, having taken possession of the animal, you are obligated to see that it is cared for until the dispute is resolved. But you are entitled to recover fair costs related to the pet's care and delivery.

Next stop is small claims or mediation. (We hope you kept a copy of the reward flyer to bolster your case.) Assuming dog-loser shows up, he needs a really good (legal) reason for reneging on his offer and breaching the contract. "I changed my mind" or "I don't have it" won't fly. As usual, don't ask us how to collect once you've won, though you do have a lien against the dog and can sell it for the amount of the reward unless by now it's captured your heart.

The Team Matthew Alice mouthpiece sez this child's guide to the law of rewards and contracts could have a few hiccups. You can't demand a reward if none is offered, essentially holding the pooch hostage for payment. You can't claim a reward if you return the pet without knowing in advance that a reward has been offered (if, say, you find a dog, track the owner from its I.D. tags without ever seeing the reward flyer, and return dog to owner). Both parties must have advance knowledge of all the terms for a contract to be established. And, of course, no contract is established if any of the actions or items involved are illegal or stolen (our earlier hooker analogy, f'rinstance). But in general, in the basic scenario in the question, the pet-finder is holding not only the dog but all the cards.

Bike World Update

The Tour of California, second edition, begins Sunday. You'll recall that this is America's biggest big-deal professional bike race, featuring the biggest big-deal teams from Europe (CSC, T-Mobile, Rabobank), and the sole big-deal United States team (Discovery Channel). Eighteen teams will compete in the tour that runs, in noncontiguous stages, from San Francisco to Long Beach. Organizers say it's 700 miles and will last eight days.

Last year's champion, Floyd Landis, will not be competing this year, and if the May 14 arbitration hearing (brought to you by the good people at the United States Anti-Doping Agency) goes as expected, he won't be competing next year either. Landis also won last year's Tour de France and faces the same situation in that race.

The debacle that was the 2006 Tour de France was so complete that the stench of it reached the American general sporting population, a demographic that normally regards professional cycling as one step below roller derby.

But, you can understand why the stink carried that far. In terms of public humiliation, the 2006 Tour de France was the best. By the time the race began, the number two, three, four, and five finishers from the previous year had been removed from the field. Number one had retired.

Suddenly, second-tier riders had a shot. Saying that, Landis had a good race through the Pyrenees, good enough to take the yellow jersey (by ten seconds) after the 15th stage. And then, the collapse: he finished the 16th stage 8:08 behind the leader, looking like dead-man-pedaling. And then, *the next day*, he flew over five hard climbs, cranked out the last 80 miles *alone*, and made up all but 38 seconds of what he'd lost. An incredible story, a Hollywood story, even the French press got behind Landis. And then the bust.

Landis's urine samples after stage 17 showed that his ratio of testosterone to epitestosterone was 11 to 1, far above the usual ratio of 1 to 1 and way over the allowed ratio of 4 to 1. Worse, his sample showed traces of synthetic testosterone. A second sample tested positive, and he was fired from his team, Phonak, and the wheels began to grind at USA Cycling, the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI), and the World Anti-Doping Agency.

Landis is using what has become the standard athlete's defense against a doping charge: attack the tests, attack the methodology of the tests, question the chain of control, and propose alternate theories. His legal opponents are barred from commenting on the case. Robbie Robertson, lead guitarist for The Band, said that after 16 years on the road, "The numbers start to scare you." Floyd Landis is one of six Lance Armstrong teammates who have admitted doping or failed a drug test.

I don't know if Armstrong doped. I don't know if Landis doped. I do know that the 2006 Tour de France, the sport's showcase to the world, did not start four of its top-five 2005 finishers because of a doping scandal, and its 2006 champion was charged with doping. A neutral observer might think, "Golly, fellas, maybe it's time to clean house."

What's happened since July 2006?

Well, Ivan Basso, regarded as the sport's dominant rider after Armstrong, was removed from last year's Tour de France and fired from his team, CSC. He's been hired by Lance Armstrong to be the new leader of the Discovery Channel Team, which will be appearing in a Tour of California near you. (Armstrong and his agent, Bill Stapleton, are stakeholders in Tailwind Sports. Tailwind Sports owns and manages a professional cycling team. Discovery Channel is its main sponsor.)

The 2006 bust, known as Operación Puerto, was not a silly thing. Spanish authorities had been working on it for years. They made raids. They seized drugs and doping paraphernalia. They found reams of paper containing names of professional cyclists, dates, doses, and so on. The information made its way to national cycling federations and tour officials.

That should be it, right? Not quite; a Spanish judge ruled the material couldn't be used by any sports-governing body or national anti-doping agency until all the criminal cases were completed. We're talking many dog lifetimes. Everybody walked.

What I'm waiting for is a grand convocation of sponsors — the UCI, the owners of the Tour de France, Tour of Spain, Tour of Italy — to put together a draconian schedule of drug tests that will be so thorough, so frequent, and processed in so many worldclass facilities, coupled with hand-in-glove cooperation with police agencies, that no skeptic could reasonably doubt the honesty of professional cycling. And penalties should be drastic: five-year suspension for the first offense, lifetime ban for the second.

That hasn't happened. Hasn't begun to happen. In fact, six months after Operación Puerto, it's business as usual in pro-cycling world.

"Nobody likes a smelly dog," I said to my husband Patrick. We were discussing Nellie, our terrier, and the fact that the last time we left her with my friend Bernice, Bernice gave her a bath. Patrick was a little embarrassed, but he had to admit that Bernice probably had good reason. Plus, Nellie's been scratching and biting a lot more than usual of late. By conversation's end, we had

resolved to start in with regular baths - twice a month.

Before Patrick could start grumbling about the messy tub and dog hair in the drain, I called South Bark Dog Wash in South Park (619-232-7387; www.south-

bark.com) and spoke with owner Donna Walker. "South Bark is a gathering place for dog and cat lovers," she began, noting that no reservations were required. "I'm listing cats because we are equal opportunity. We have a retail shop with really cool products, and we have a self-serve dog spa. The bulk of the dog wash is filled with canines, of course, but we do get cats in here."

Upon entering South Bark, where the decor is as whimsical as the name, I'm asked if I am shopping or bathing. "If you're bathing, you're sent back to one of the assistants — a trained dog handler — who will guide you through the process. They'll ask what types of shampoos and conditioners you'd like to use, if there are any skin conditions, find out if the dog is aggressive or not social, and if you have any special needs."

Once you've got all that sorted out, "we send you outside to do a little brushing. We believe you should loosen up the hair with a bit of brushing. We have many different kinds of brushes; which one you use depends on the kind of hair the dog has. A shedder is a metallooped brush with short ridges on one end and longer ridges on the other side. You can open them and shed the fur or keep them in the rounded position. A rake brush works on the undercoat of the dog to remove hair. The pin brush generally takes hair off the topcoat. And there's a styling brush with tiny tines for styling," but that gets used after the bath.

Then it's back inside for the tubbing. "My business partner Lisa Vella and I came up with what we call the 'Island Tub' pattern," explained Walker. "The tubs are in the middle of the spa, in the pattern of a

capital H. Most dog washes 3 have the tubs against the wall. Our tubs are raised up on platforms - one side is higher, one lower. That is so people of taller or shorter stature who have dogs of taller or shorter stature can have a more ergonomic washing experience. The tubs are human-size tubs; they can hold a 300-pound animal. Around the middle of the H are two grooming tables. We have metal separation barriers, made by artists, between the tubs. This gives the dogs and their people privacy: you can still kind of see through them, but the dog can't jump through. It allows my staff to walk around and see if anyone needs anything."

When it's time to get your dog into the tub, "the tub stairs pull out, and the staff secures the dog in the tub for the client. We use a groomer's noose — it's an adjustable noose with a rubber line that ends in a suction cup. The cup can be moved around the tub. In the beginning, we'll secure the dog, but after a while, most dogs start to love the bath so much that we end up not having to use them."

Step one of the bathing experience at South Bark is the house special: the blueberry facial. "We developed the facial because people would come in and wash their dogs but not the dogs' faces," said Walker. "The dog would have a beautiful body, but a dirty or sticky face. We developed a product, and now we sell it across the United States. It's tearless, and it's aromatherapeutic, brightening, and cleansing. We mist the face, massage, and then remove with heated wash cloths.

The dog's owner steps up for the actual washing, and starts by soaking the dog with a handheld sprayer. "I can modulate the temperature of the bath, depending on how warm or cold it is outside," said Walker. "Dogs can

feel heat more sensitively than we can, so you don't want it too hot or too cold." When it comes to shampooing, ``thereare many techniques. We believe in diluting the shampoo, but still giving the client at least one whole bottle's worth. You'd think it was a lot, but it really isn't, and the diluted shampoo really gets into the skin and the coat."

South Bark's basic shampoos -Eucalyptus Shine and Lavender Mint — are meant to be lathered in and rinsed off. But if a client wants a specialty shampoo — say, a color enhancer (\$2) for bringing out a coat's reds, browns, or whites, or a medicated shampoo (\$4) for treating dry skin — then those need to be left in for three to five minutes. Conditioners, like brushes, vary by hair type. "Our basic wash package includes a spray-on conditioner. However, if a dog has sensitive skin, we have a gentle hypoallergenic, Ultra Silk [\$1.50]. We also offer a medium-grade conditioner called Plum [\$1.50], and a heavy-duty conditioner, Apple Oats, with a shine in it [\$1.50]."

Hair type and sensitivity also govern drying choices. "Towels for towel drying are included in the basic package. We also have a fluffer dryer [\$2] — a forced air unit, kind of like a blow dryer. It's used for blowing out loose hair and for styling. It's good for dogs with thick, dense hair." Dogs with long and silky hair are better off with towels or in the cage dryer (\$3). "The dog sits in it; it's like a Jacuzzi of air going around the dog. Our staff is highly educated; they'll look at each animal and help you decide what your dog needs."

The basic dog-wash package costs **\$12** and includes the basic shampoo, washcloths, brushes, apron, towels, grooming table use, blueberry facial, and grooming spray. First time clients may choose a complimentary conditioner upgrade.





Fish Food

Thy food is such as hath been belched on by infected lungs.

don't know what I found more disturbing: the words, "It can be difficult to keep the live octopus in your mouth," or the accompanying illustration of a man seated at a table, his eyes locked open in terror, with eight tentacled arms stretching from his mouth and attaching themselves by suction to every corner of his face. I'd seen this before in the movie *Alien*.

The mirage of pasta faded away and another image came sharply into focus. Tiny eyeballs, hundreds of them, were staring back at me. Snapping my head in David's direction, I begged, "PLEASE tell me we're not going to have to see anything like this in Japan." David ignored me and turned the page. Color drawings of raw eggs, chicken innards on a skewer, and slices of something pink did nothing to quell my fears. *Two weeks of this*

weird shit, I thought. I tried to put a positive spin on the impending ordeal and told myself, *Hey, maybe I'll* lose a few pounds.

My food horizons have expanded exponentially since I met David. B.D. (Before David), I considered extra ketchup on my Kraft Mac & Cheese adventurous. Expensive dishes in which food was carefully arranged in aesthetically pleasing designs were referred to as "fancy crap," and anything French was dubbed, "snails and shit." Though I haven't wavered in my aversion to the rich sauces and slimy fare of "high-end" French restaurants, I am now more likely to taste exotic cuisine (like cheeses that come with a rind), and I have learned to appreciate food that looks as good as it tastes.

Despite my growth, however, the idea of eating in Japan made my jaw clench in apprehension. See, I don't like fish. Unless it is a skinned and boneless chunk of halibut that has completely taken on the flavor of whatever it's been drenched in, I don't even want to see it on the table. Should it end up there anyway, I will avert my gaze and breathe through my mouth until it disappears. It's not just fish, either, but anything fish-related — the sight, smell, or texture of ocean plants, fresh or dried, triggers my gag reflex. In short, I was about to enter a foreign land that specialized in my culinary nightmare.

The month before we left, David and I undertook a cultural crash course. We ate at Japanese restaurants all over San Diego County. I ventured beyond teriyaki chicken and experimented with cucumber rolls, ramen, udon noodles, and even the esoteric *katsu-don*— a breaded chicken cutlet served in a bowl over seasoned rice and grilled onions and topped with a fried egg. I insisted on eating a burrito the day before we left, and I savored every bite as if it were my last.

"I'm not worried anymore," I said to David during the hour-long bus ride to our hotel in Tokyo. So far, everything had been safely Western — back at the airport, I had even purchased a latte from a vendor that sold hot dogs. I was lulled into complacency by the smiling face painted on the brightly colored, human-sized statue of a hot dog that stood next to me while I waited for my coffee.

But it turned out that navigating food wasn't as simple as avoiding fish — every item, even innocuous-seeming ingredients like chicken and tomatoes, was suspect. Apparently, anything I happen to find disgusting is a delicacy in the land of the rising sun. Things like gristle, skin, and fat, or fruit and veggies soaked in fish oil. I learned this the hard way, after I'd confidently passed through an entrance over which was painted a giant chicken — a familiar symbol that imbued me with a false sense of security.

Upon glimpsing our whiteness, the waiter handed us an English menu, a gesture that left me feeling both offended and relieved. I ordered some kind of chicken meal deal (or "set," as they call it), which came with an appetizer, soup, chicken, and rice. When the food arrived, my second impulse (the first had been to choke back bile) was to look for cameras. This has to be some kind of joke they play on foreigners, I thought. In a shiny, hand-painted, ceramic dish sat a raw chicken leg. That's right, that sick bastard served me the salmonella special. Beside it was my "soup" bowl, which smelled like funk and contained a tepid, nearly opaque liquid with a *raw* egg floating glistening gristle-covered bone on a bed of white rice. While I glared at the abomination of a feast before me, David chowed





happily on his fish-flake surprise.

Like any big city, Tokyo offered plenty of dining options. I sought refuge in tofu, curry, and noodles. But as Murphy would have it, the day I finally found my culinary groove was the day we were to leave for Hakone, a small resort town a few hours away. It was in this quaint traditional village that I suffered the greatest food effrontery of all.

Because I had been prepped for what lay in store — David had explained that we were staying at traditional Japanese inns for two days and would have no choice when it came to what food would be brought to our room for dinner and breakfast — I stocked up on red bean buns at the train station.

Dinner was to be served in our quarters at 7. Our server, a friendly woman named Kazukosan dressed in a beautiful kimono, brought each of the 11 courses to our private dining room, each time announcing herself before sliding open the shoji screen and entering the room on her knees. Our first course included an entire fish — head, bones, skin and all. It was three inches long. "I can't do this," I said. David smiled and popped his fish into his mouth and chewed.

The next item to arrive was a seaweed salad. Then sashimi. Then something brown and slimy looking. After Kazuko-san gracefully placed a course before us and then disappeared to let us eat, I would suspiciously inspect her latest offering. I would sniff it cautiously, look up at David, and say, "Taste this. Is it fishy?" David repeatedly answered me with a nod. In desperate, whispered pleas, I begged him to eat my food so that my dish would be empty when Kazuko-san returned to replace it with something even more

horrific.

Finally, a bowl with a lid was placed between us. After Kazuko-san had backed out of the room, I said, "You open it."

"Nope, it's all you," said David. He'd been drinking chilled sake and seemed to be enjoying my agony.

"Fine. I don't care. It's probably more fishy crap anyway." I lifted the lid. "Hey! Pasta! Ha!"

Like a mirage convincing a lone traveler wandering lost in the desert that an oasis is mere steps away, I had seen what I wanted to see in that dish because the reality was too terrible for me to fathom. The mirage of pasta faded away and another image came sharply into focus. Tiny eyeballs, hundreds of them, were staring back at

me. I dropped my chopsticks onto the table and stared into the bowl with grotesque fascination. "What the fuck? Are those...*baby eels?*"

I was stunned into silence when David doused the freaky little things with soy sauce and ate them with rice. When he was finished, David rubbed his belly like a happy Buddha. "I'm starving," I complained.

"Look," David said, in an attempt to find a bright side for me. "At least we didn't have to pry any tentacles off your face."

get my recipes either online or out of *Cooking Light* magazine. "I grew up on health food (in Santa Cruz), and I read about the nutritional values in foods pretty closely. "I don't do coupons, and I only make lists if I'm trying a

new recipe. "I go down every aisle and make sure I

don't forget anything. "We grill a lot. But I have to say that we like variety: chicken, fish, lamb, pork, beef.

"I have a few favorite recipes. I have a stuffed chicken that I like to make. I sauté chicken, mushrooms, and shallots, blend it up in a food processor, and then mix it with fat-free ricotta cheese, salt, pepper, and nutmeg. And then you poke a hole in the chicken breast, stuff all that in there, sauté it in a pan, and then there's a sauce that I put on top of it.

"I cook about four nights a week, and we go out the rest.

"I also shop at Trader Joe's. I come to Whole Foods weekly, every Monday, and I go to Trader Joe's about every other week. "I huw about 80 per

cent organic. I try to buy all organic, unless there's just something I need that I can't find."

"Standing behind these people in line at the checkouts in a lot of supermarkets, I get this impression of 'nothing

living.' But I think the idea behind our food should be that it should capture as much of the sun as possible. Instead, most of it is designed for shelf-life instead of nutritive value. That's why I only eat organic. I try to eat something living that can transmute into my life. But most food today - with preservatives and corn syrups and stuff like that — is more of a deficit to your body than an enhancement."

Woni Spotts, 42 Little Italy Works in e-commerce, selling merchandise online



Woni Spotts

Spent \$106 today. Shops once a week for about \$100. Lives alone, prepares food for herself, but doesn't *cook. Only eats raw food.* "I only shop at Whole Foods, but I also order food online from specialty raw-food websites.

"I'm eating raw food only now, so I have to go to the places that have the best variety of foods. I started eating raw about six months ago. I was vegetarian for a while and got a good boost from that, and then I was vegan and got a bigger boost, so now I'm raw and I'm getting a better boost. And I can't go any further, I don't think.

"I eat at home almost always, but I don't cook anything, of course. I usually make a big salad with sun-dried tomatoes, olives, sprouts, avocado, dates, and baby vegetables that are tender and don't need to be cooked.

"And then I have some raw bread that I buy. That's a specialty item that I get online, because I've only found one company that makes a raw bread that's edible.

"And I'll also have fresh fruit, of course, and nuts and nut butters, and fresh juices and smoothies throughout the day.

"I manage to stay

chubby, you know, so it can't be that bad.

"I had a favorite raw-food restaurant in New York City, and I have them FedEx me some specialty items sometimes, but I haven't really found any places out here in San Diego yet. But I've only lived here about a month."

Spent \$110 today. Cooks for self and husband, also retired. "I shop big once every two weeks, with small supplemental shopping in between.

"I shop at Albertson's, and Costco



as well.

"I cook a lot of things, but my favorite is green chili guacamole enchiladas. I make a sauce out of cream-ofchicken soup and long green California chilis that have been roasted and peeled. Then garlic, salt, pepper, and one or two jalapeños. Then cilantro leaves - not the stems, just the leaves. And then I put it all in the blender, warm it up, and that's the sauce. The filling is shredded chicken, black olives, green onions, and jack cheese.

"I'm more aware of nutritional panels now, because both my husband and I are diabetic, and we've had to start to pay attention to that. I don't buy all the heavy stuff, like I used to. We eat heavy like that now maybe twice a week. Other times, if we have a good breakfast, then we'll have sandwiches for dinner. Or if we don't have a good breakfast, then we'll go out to dinner or I'll cook a big dinner. Usually, we don't have lunch.

"I lost 22 pounds since retirement by eating lighter and less often. My husband's lost a lot of weight as well.

"We shop together, my husband and I, always. Usually, he'll say not to buy something, but then if I get it, he'll still sit down and eat it. So that's how that goes. I say, 'I don't know why I listen to you. I should just get it anyway.' And then I do, and he usually likes it. So!"

Rafael Quijano, 25 North Park Delivery-truck driver Today he got a bottle of

white zinfandel for his girlfriend (for later) and a Caesar salad for lunch for himself. Cooks once in a while,

lives with girlfriend. "She does about 75 percent of the cooking, and I do the rest.

"Most of the time, we shop together, but if I get off work early, then I'll go out for a lot of the little things. Usually for the big stuff, we go together.

"We shop at Vons and Albertson's mostly.

"We cook at home three or four times a week and eat out the rest. We also have breakfast at home but eat out






much. I do all of the cooking. Say six or seven days a week.

once a week.


"We eat at home almost every night. We hardly ever go out. "I eat what I like, and I don't cook what I don't like."







Ray Bogowitz and Bob Rudd decided to leave at dawn for a ten-mile trek to the ruins of the old San Pedro Martir mission, rumored to have been the base for some silver-mining operation.

If you had to pick a group of people to pit against a large, deadly rattlesnake, the men and women who drove south into the Baja wilderness last June would have been a good choice. Most important, every one of the nine was profoundly at ease in the wilderness, indeed, had sought refuge in it repeatedly, almost compulsively, over the years. They could take care of themselves, they all thought.

They thought not so much in terms of "taking care of" rattlesnakes as casually coexisting with them. Every person in the group had encountered the local vipers on many occasions. One man, Glen Conklin, even liked to catch wild rattlesnakes with his bare hands; though he'd been bitten a few times, he had suffered no ill effects. One of the women on the trip said complacently, "I'm more afraid of traffic accidents than rattlesnakes." Said another, "We've been camping for so many years, so many times, and no one has ever gotten hurt by one." They had come to assume, at least on some level of consciousness, that no one ever would.

The trip on which someone finally did was planned for the third week in June, one of the many half-spontaneous outings spawned by the "Baja group." That's what people call the loose, informal association of 30 or 40 San Diego County residents who share a passion for Baja and get together for potlucks maybe once a month to show their most recent slides. Some have been camping together for 20 years, others are newcomers, but almost everyone is a longtime San Diego County resident.

Betty and Glen Conklin heard about the trip to La Grulla Meadow from Dick Schwenkmeyer, an old friend and biology teacher at Mesa College. Schwenkmeyer and his wife Verle had made the 250-mile trip several times; in fact, Dick had twice led groups from the San Diego Natural History Museum to La Grulla, a high meadow located in the center of Baja's Sierra San Pedro Martir National Park, just about halfway between San Quintín and San Felipe. The Schwenkmeyers were planning to return this year with the Conklins, and when Claire Brey heard this, she envied them. Claire, a grandmother, lives in La Jolla and is still a hardy hiker, but back troubles had always prevented her from visiting this particular spot, since reaching it requires carrying a backpack over a halfdozen miles that begin at an elevation of 7500 feet. Then Claire got the idea of hiring a pack mule from a ranch near the meadow; Verle Schwenkmeyer and Betty Conklin also like the idea of having mules carry their packs. At a "Baja group" beginning-of-thesummer party, word of the outing spread. Among those who decided to join it were Rosemary Nugent, the 33-year-old food serv-

ice director for the Francis Parker School, and a hiking buddy of Rosemary's named Ray Bogowitz.

On the Saturday morning Ray left his Poway home, his spirits were high. Fiftynine years old, he had taken an early retirement last December from his job as a metallurgist at Solar, and practically every day since then, he had exclaimed to his wife how happy he was to have done so. Ray adored being outdoors, particularly

in the wilderness, and though a seasoned Baja explorer, he had never laid his eyes on La Grulla Meadow. When his automobile battery started acting up the morning of the trip, he wasn't about to let that ruin his day. He managed to get to Mission Hills, where he picked up Rosemary Nugent; then the two of them stopped in Chula Vista to buy a spare battery and some medication for Rosemary, who just that morning had broken a tooth.

By midafternoon they had made it to the landmark Meling Ranch, the cattle and guest ranch located about 22 miles from the entrance to the Mexican national park. 
That Saturday afternoon, the Conklins, Ray, and Rosemary weren't thinking any such gloomy thoughts. Ray was renowned for his ability to fix mechanical things under even the most primitive of circumstances, and he set to work immediately on the disabled vehicle. But finally he had to admit he was foiled by the lack of metric tools. From the ranch, the group was able to radio to a man in Colonia Guerrero with a telephone. He in turn called San Diego and asked the other group members to bring the needed tools, a low bar, and some transmission fluid. It was early afternoon the next day by the time the supplies arrived, borne by the five other members of the expedition: Claire Brey, the Schwenkmeyers, and a married couple in their early 40s, Karen and Bob Rudd. Everyone was anxious to reach the meadow, though, and so the job of repairing the Conklins' truck was postponed until the return trip.

By early Sunday evening, the party of nine had driven from the Meling Ranch to their trail head — a spot inside the park called La Tasajera. There they met Petin Thing, the 58-year-old vaquero who had agreed to work as their mule driver. After supper by the campfire, everyone bedded down early, and they arose early the next morning. By eight they had loaded Petin's two mules and left the vehicles behind to follow a trail that twists through stands of pines and manzanita, passing great granitic boulders, crossing a small stream, leading steadily downward about a thousand feet, many times over the steep faces of ancient rocks. Rosemary and Ray, the friskiest hikers, reached the sandybottomed meadow at the end of the trail after about three and a half hours, then settled down to wait for the others to trickle in: first the Conklins and the Rudds, then the Schwenkmeyers and Claire Brey.

Over the next few days, Bob Rudd took photographs of the meadow, and the images are amazing. A verdant carpet covers the meadow for miles in all directions. The only reminder of how brutally broken is most of this part of the world is the mountains. Once a lake covered the meadow bed, and the

land hasn't completely dried out; people tell stories about mules wandering off and disappearing into the boggier patches of ground. More than a dozen ranchers run their cattle in the park during the summer. No roads have been built here, and no truck could enter. This is a fragment of the Old West, still surviving. People travel by horseback or on foot.

By one that afternoon, the San Diego hikers had made their way to a cluster of trees and boulders bordered on one side by a meandering stream. Several vaqueros were fishing there, hooking plump trout with nothing more than worms stuck on crude hooks tied to kite string. Nearby the hikers set up a central campfire that they would use for communal meals. Two big logs provided seating, and a slab from a broken boulder formed a convenient serving table. But though they would share their meals, the members of the group scattered when they went to set up their bedrolls, each individual or couple settling into private

nooks spread over an area the size of a baseball field: No one wandered very far from camp that day, but by the next morning, the divergent interests in the group had sorted the nine individuals into three different parties. The older two couples and Claire Brey hiked a short loop around the meadow, while Rosemary Nugent and the Rudds followed a longer loop that took them to the noisy scene where vaqueros were hard at work, branding their cattle, cutting ears, and inoculating the animals.

Ray Bogowitz struck off alone across country to visit Rancho Viejo, another cowboy camp he had never seen before. This was typical of Ray, who commonly ventured forth on solitary hikes. People in the Baja group thought of him as a risk taker, as well as a man extraordinarily competent at extracting himself from sticky situations.

But none of the group ran into any trouble that first full, idyllic day, and in the evening, each made eager plans for the next morning.

Three of the women announced they wanted to relax and so would head for a pool where the streambed widened to read, sun themselves, and wade. Dick Schwenkmeyer planned to lead a second group including his wife, the Conklins, and Rosemary Nugent on a seven-mile hike to La Encantada Meadow where Dick had found a *metate* some years before. He hoped to relocate the grinding stone and carry it back in a day pack. Most ambitious were the plans of Ray Bogowitz and Bob Rudd, who decided to leave at dawn for a ten-mile trek to the ruins of the old San Pedro Martir mission, rumored to have been the base for some silver-mining operation. Originally they had talked about hiking to the site and camping overnight there, returning the next day. But then Petin had advised that with an early start, a day trip would be feasible, if physically demanding. It sounded a little too punishing a hike for the taste of Rosemary, who originally had thought about

going but changed her plans to join Dick Schwenkmeyer's group.

Still, the outing to the mission must have lingered in Rosemary's unconscious, for she had a dream about it, an oddly disturbing one. Early Wednesday morning, she had heard Ray preparing to leave, and he apologized for walking through the area where she was sleeping. She rolled over and went back to sleep, and probably a halfhour later she dreamed everyone was standing around her, discussing whether to wake her. Ray was saying, "Don't wake her. Let her sleep," when Rosemary sat straight up in her sleeping bag and said, "Don't go! Don't leave me behind!" It was then she realized Ray and Bob Rudd had already departed; there was no way she could communicate her misgivings. Throughout that day, June 25, Rosemary was to feel a sense of ill-defined malaise.

By the time Rosemary awoke from her nightmare, Ray and Bob had hiked halfway to the end of La Grulla Meadow. Petin, mounted on horseback, led them along the trail leading to the neighboring Alcatraz Meadow; then about 7:15 a.m., the two hikers and their guide plunged into the brush, heading west through stands of Jeffrey pine, redshank, and manzanita. By eight, they had reached the top of a high ridge, and Petin described the landmarks that would lead Ray and Bob the rest of the way to the mission: a canyon called Arroyo Alcatraz, two distant ridges, then a pine-filled valley, and finally a sharp drop-off to their destination. Ray and Bob said good-bye to the vaquero and soon came to the bottom of the arroyo through which water coursed. "What a lovely place for a picnic," Ray commented. They filled their water bottles and pressed on. Their first encounter

with a rattlesnake turned out to be graceful and a little comic. They had headed south into a small side canyon they hoped would lead them over the top of the first ridge. Ray was crashing along, maybe 50 yards in the lead, when he vaulted over a log crossing the bottom of the gully and called out, "Rattlesnake!" in an emphatic but calm voice. He had landed with one foot on either side of the serpent. But the rat-

tlesnake fortunately was in the process of swallowing a small rabbit, and thus it was in no position to bite anything else, no matter how close. After withdrawing a few paces, Ray and Bob found themselves looking at a fully mature Southern Pacific rattlesnake, the most common rattlesnake found in Southern California and Baja. These snakes range from the beaches to the high mountains, though the coastal snakes tend to be more gray and mottled, whereas the mountain dwellers are blacker and bigger. Hikers say the mountain variants disturbingly resemble the dead tree branches found everywhere. Some people also claim these particular snakes are unusually aggressive, more apt to strike with no provocation. Others say they're simply more ill-tempered and nervous. In any case, Ray and Bob were sufficiently unruffled by the incident to photograph both the snake, before it went sidewinding into the bushes, and the half-digested rabbit that it hastily disgorged.

The men hiked on, crossing both ridges described by Petin, and reaching the pinefilled valley by ten that morning. For a while the going



Ray's wife Gloria didn't come along on the La Grulla trip, but she has camped and hiked uncountable times with her husband over the years, and she says he never once felt threatened by rattlesnakes. Gloria says Ray's attitude was that the snakes were here first, and humans had intruded on their territory. Whenever he would find a rattlesnake on the one-acre Bogowitz home in Poway, Ray made a point of removing rather than

killing it. The day he was bitten, he wasn't even carrying a snakebite kit, but Bob had packed one of those kits that looks a little like an overgrown green capsule, manufactured by Cutter Laboratories. He immediately extracted the thin string from it and tied it around Ray's upper calf. Though Bob inserted a stick and twisted it, the tourniquet seemed a flimsy barricade to any venom. However, Ray claimed he felt no pain, just a slight

tingly sensation throughout his body. He nonetheless requested that Bob use the "scalpel" contained in the snakebite kit to cut the fang marks (so venom could be more easily suctioned from them). Bob sliced maybe a half-inch into Ray's flesh, cutting two X-shaped incisions; he felt as though he didn't know exactly what to do, but he somehow figured it was important to cut deeper where the fangs had penetrated, and they had gone



"When I was carving on him, you would have thought Ray would have winced a little bit, but he was just as relaxed as if I were stroking him with a feather," Bob marvels today. When Bob tried to use the plastic suction cup included in the snakebite kit, it hardly seemed to cover the wounds, and finally he suggested it might be better if he tried to suck the venom out with his mouth. "Well, if you wouldn't mind," Ray said with mannered calmness.

Bob recalls, "I was getting pretty good mouthfuls of blood for a while, then everything seemed to coagulate." Less than three minutes had elapsed since the time of the bite. He substi-

tuted the waist strap from his day pack for the flimsy string tourniquet, then helped Ray walk down to the edge of the water in the arroyo. Though Ray was unusually wobbly, he still reported no pain or swelling, just a faint sensation of numbness throughout his body. The two men both began to hope the bite had been "dry," as it sometimes happens, delivering little or no venom. Briefly they discussed the possibility of setting up camp on the spot, allowing Ray a chance to rest and recover. But Ray seemed adamant about wanting to get back to the base camp, a trip he didn't think he could make on foot. Around 3:00 p.m., Bob settled Ray as comfortably as he could, then he set off on the trek back for help.

"I was pretty excited," Bob recalls. He tried to run, but his hiking boots kept hitting the rocks and brush that armor the Baja mountains, and finally he settled into a fast, steady march. His emotions were mixed. Though he felt a real sense of urgency, the accident also seemed more than anything an inconvenience. Bob was virtually certain rattlesnake venom invariably causes intense pain, so Ray's bite had to be dry, he told himself.

By the time he reached the lower end of La Grulla Meadow, around 4:45 p.m., and began searching for one of the local vaqueros, Bob's mouth and throat were sore from breathing so heavily. It didn't take long to find some cowboys who rode off and brought Petin to Bob, about a mile outside the hikers' camp. In broken Spanish, Bob explained where Ray was, then watched Petin gallop south down the meadow. As the vaquero's figure grew small in the distance, Bob felt a wave of relief. "At that time, I thought Petin would surely know what to do. These guys live on these horses. And I'm sure they have people injured down there. And they must know how to transport them out on horseback."

When Bob strode into camp a few minutes later, a worried crowd greeted him.

They had heard a brief, confusing report about the snakebite from Petin, and they grilled Bob for details. Quickly the group reached the consensus that Bob and Glen Conklin should also head for the spot where Bob had left Ray, in case Petin had any problem finding the snakebite victim. The group hurried to gather every item they could imagine Ray might need: soap, thermal underwear, bedding, and some food. Once Ray was back in base camp, they could more fully assess his condition; with any luck, he would be feeling shaken but healthy. If





outside help were needed, then Dick Schwenkmeyer would hike the six miles back to the cars at the first sign of light the next morning.

To this day, the people in the group still talk about whether this was the right decision. Everyone knew that the fastest way to return to the cars was on horseback, but dusk was approaching, the night would be moonless, and Petin insisted that no horse or mule could climb the steep and tortuous trail leading out of the meadow in the dark. For Dick to hike out on foot would have exposed him not only to the

danger of stepping on a rattlesnake himself but also that of falling or getting hopelessly lost. He couldn't have reached any place with a radio much before midnight, and then there was a question of who would have responded to a call for help at that hour of the night. Besides all that, Dick adds, "We just didn't know how Ray was. I could have gone up and gotten the US Army together and brought all these people down there and found Ray walking back in. That would have been really embarrassing." So everyone hoped for

the best. Glen and Bob, though tired, were in good spirits as they made their way down the trails leading to the Alcatraz Arroyo. the base camp. For a long time, they could see nothing. Only slowly did the light from the campfire illuminate the shadowy figures of Petin, two other vaqueros, and Ray — and with their approach vanished the communal hope that Ray had sustained only a dry bite. The tall, lean gringo was ashen-faced and draped over the horse like a rag doll. Part of what shocked those who greeted him was the swiftness with which this vigorous, energetic man, renowned for his catlike survival instincts, had deteriorated. As the group helped him down, he was cold to the touch. Though Ray had donned an insulated shirt, he still wore only his hiking shorts. But he managed coherently to

express how happy he was to be back with the group; the ride back had been the most miserable experience of his entire life, he said without equivocation.

Apart from the venom, one of the great dangers of rattlesnake bite comes from the risk of simple infection, and the women in the group knew this. So they immediately turned their attention to cleaning the wound. Ray's leg had swollen considerably, and though he still wasn't feeling much pain, he reported feeling increasing numbness and tingling, other common symptoms of envenomation. As they ministered to him, the group learned why it had taken so long to transport Ray back. Petin's horse wasn't strong

enough to carry both the vaquero and the stricken man, so Ray rode alone but he already had lost so much muscle coordination that several times he fell from the animal's back to the rocky ground. Finally, Petin had been forced to leave Ray alone in the dark and return to the cowboy camp where he summoned two more vaqueros, including one who had a horse capable of carrying two riders. Even thus assisted, the rescue party had had to stop several times and let Ray down to the ground, whether to sleep or regain consciousness no one was sure.

Later, Claire Brey would look back and comment on how the crisis brought out unique strengths in different people."Somebody would just start bossing the group around, and the rest of us would follow, and then someone else would take over." Once the group had helped Ray into a sleeping bag and piled warm clothing on him, Rosemary Nugent, Ray's young hiking companion, stepped into command. They should set up nursing watches, she suggested, with two people on each watch. She and Karen Rudd took the first tour of duty and quickly developed a routine in which they worked at keeping Ray comfortable, periodically offering him tiny sips of weak Tang to prevent dehydration. They also monitored his heart and respiration, thinking that when a doctor got there, he would want such information. Throughout that first shift and the second, in which Betty Conklin and Claire Brey took over, Ray's pulse held right at 66 beats per minute. He breathed easily and steadily.

He seemed to remain stable as Dick Schwenkmeyer and Petin saddled up one of his mules and his horse and rode out of the camp a little after five in the morning. Although Dick hadn't been on a horse in 25 years, the two men still managed to arrive at the trail head in just about two hours. There they climbed into Dick's truck. Petin had suggested that instead of seeking help at the Meling Ranch, they should head for the astronomical observatory operated by the University of Mexico inside

the national park. It was closer, about a 70-minute ride from the trail head, and its radio was likely to be in better shape than the one at the Meling Ranch.

Schwenkmeyer's heart sped up a little as the buildings of the observatory operations center came into view around 8:30 a.m. Within minutes, he and Petin had enlisted the aid of the resident electronics engineer, a man named José Murillo, who led the visitors to the radio shack near the top of the mountain. Dick's first thought was to call the operator in San Diego and ask for the emergency number 911. Almost immediately a voice answered. Dick tried to explain as succinctly as possible what had happened.





To his dismay, however, the voice curtly informed him that 911 services don't extend south of the border.

Dismissed without even a suggestion for whomever else he might call, Dick asked Murillo to try Scripps Hospital; perhaps a Life Flight helicopter could bring help to Ray, he thought. Twice Murillo reached the hospital, and both times Dick tried to talk with the operator only to hear her hang up. This time the problem was that the radio signal from the observatory was taking six or seven seconds to reach the hospital; when the hospital's switchboard operator heard nothing, she must have assumed

the caller had hung up. Murillo then took the initiative and radioed a government agency in Mexicali, where a helicopter might be available — only to be told that it had flown to Mexico City for some official function. At last, good fortune seemed to have smiled on the group. Within moments word came that clearance for the US flight into Mexico had been granted by officials in Mexico City — an achievement nearly miraculous in its speed (it had taken more than 24 hours to get such permission in the past). Dick began worrying about how the helicopter would find the proper site on the meadow, but another radio message came to the observatory from someone at the Meling Ranch who volunteered to fly a small plane up and escort the chopper in.





in his chest. Around ten or eleven, his heartbeat had begun to sound somewhat erratic, skipping beats. Every hour or so, he would ask the time, and at one point, he talked with Rosemary about whether she understood clearly how to operate his truck. But Rosemary doesn't think at any point Ray himself doubted he would make it, nor did anyone else in the group.

About 11:30 a.m., Rosemary was sitting with Ray under a sunshade that the group had rigged when she noticed that his eyes were open and somewhat glazed. Alarmed, she ran from the spot to find Claire Brey, who had gone to rest on her pad in the middle of the meadow.

Years before Claire had learned CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), and once she verified Ray had indeed stopped breathing, Claire dubiously acceded to Rosemary's panicked request that the group administer the resuscitation technique. No one else had had the train-

ing, so Claire not only had to struggle to remember the exact sequence for pushing on Ray's chest and blowing air into his lungs, but she also found it difficult to direct her assistants. Glen Conklin recalls, "You see it done in the movies and all that, but it's not all that easy working with a dead person. He's cold, and there's no response. Ray had a little mustache, and you're supposed to get your lips up over his." People tire quickly; they hyperventilate. At one point, when Verle Schwenkmeyer's turn came to blow into Ray's lungs, she wasn't succeeding at getting the air in. Frightened, panicky, she cried, "I'm not doing it right! I'm not doing it right!"

"Keep it up, Verle," other people implored her.

Today Glen looks back and says, "We didn't have experience with this. But something had to be done. We didn't know if it was the right thing. But we tried."

The group struggled valiantly for almost half an hour, but Ray remained lifeless. One by one, the members of the group stepped back and admitted to themselves the unthinkable: Ray was gone.

Like almost everyone else in the group, Glen Conklin felt utter shock; he simply could not believe what had just happened. While he fought quietly to retain his composure, Rosemary cried hysterically, calling out, "No! Don't leave us Ray! No!" Claire Brey wept too, as she hugged Rosemary and tried to comfort her. Several long minutes passed before the paroxysm of grief began to subside and Claire began directing the men to place Ray's body in his bedroll, then to cover that with cloth and plastic.

'You're still sort of thinking in terms of him as being Ray," Claire says. "You're trying to make him comfortable, put him in a nice shady place under a tree while waiting for the helicopter to arrive. I actually don't know when I began to think of him as 'the body.' He was Ray for a long time after he was dead." At some point, someone did

If no helicopter showed up, the corpse would have to be removed on horseback. Finally, the group decided to check Ray periodically; if stiffness appeared to be setting in, they would maneuver him into a transportable position.

Early in the afternoon, Petin arrived bearing the news that a chopper was on its way, and around 2:00 p.m., the small plane from the Meling Ranch appeared and began flying a seemingly endless series of circles overhead. But it was 2:45 before the group heard the first sound of the Coast Guard helicopter's blades slicing though the thin air.

It passed overhead, then disappeared. The people on the ground wondered if the pilot somehow had failed to see them, though that seemed doubtful, since they had spread out their colorful tarps on the meadow as a primitive landing marker. The next time the sound of the chopper swelled, everyone ran out waving their arms and hollering, yet once again the helicopter flew out of sight. Finally, on its third pass the pilot signaled to the wildly gesturing people on the ground. When the helicopter finally landed about a mile away and the men on board reached the waiting group, they explained how little maneuverability a heavy helicopter has at such an altitude. Incapable of hovering, the pilot had had to search for a spot where he could land and roll over the rough ground before coming to a stop. When the helicopter

took off an hour or so later, Claire Brey says she was still thinking in terms of "Ray" being on board and seeing the beautiful mountains as the aircraft flew out of the meadow. The group had earlier packed up and had planned to hike out as soon as the helicopter left, but it was after 4:00 p.m., suddenly too late for the difficult trek, so they set up camp again. Though no one said anything, every person there noticed how everyone had arranged his bedroll close to the others. They seemed more fragile to each other, more dear.

That night around the campfire, they talked about what they had done and

whether they should have handled anything differently. They talked about snakebite and marveled that no one in the group remembered with certainty much beyond the admonition to get the victim to a hospital. Someone had heard massive doses of vitamin C could help a victim; someone else recounted an even more colorful bit of folk wisdom that says if you can catch the snake that bites the victim, cut out its gall bladder, and squeeze the contents into the wound, that this will help counteract the venom. But who would have the presence of mind to catch and kill the rattlesnake when a friend is bitten? Who carries massive doses of vitamin C on a backpacking trip? Would those things have worked? Would a tighter tourniquet have saved Ray's life, at the expense of his leg? They had a dozen more questions.

They didn't talk a lot about Ray, but somehow

the gathering felt like a wake. People experienced that sense of relief that comes with huddling together after a tragedy and conversing about small things. Here and there, people made reference to Ray's quiet gentleness and his astounding skills as a mechanic and driver and wilderness explorer. For years Ray had been charting trails in the remote Laguna Hanson area in the Sierra Juarez northeast of Ensenada. In recent years, the Sierra Club had asked him to share the wonderful map he had constructed, but Ray, concerned about preserving the area's privacy, had declined. Claire Brey thought about one night she and Ray and some other hikers had been camping in the Sierra Juarez and had seen a rocket taking off from Vandenberg Air Force Base. It had lighted up the sky in an extraordinary display of light that led to a long discussion of unidentified flying objects. That group had talked about what it would be like to be invited on a UFO manned by extraterrestrials, and only Ray could say with certainty that he would not hesitate to go. He was a person always ready to go on ahead, Claire said. Something strange

occurred to the group that night as everyone lay down to sleep. Each night before, the nearby cattle had filled the night with a noise that seemed prehistoric, a mixture of cries and weird moans; rather than moos. But on the night of Ray's death, utter silence filled the valley. No wind stirred. No sound of singing from the vaqueros' camps reaching the hiking party. Something even stranger occurred a little after midnight, as everyone slept. Suddenly, Bob Rudd, Rosemary Nugent, and Claire Brey all heard a tremendous roaring, crashing, banging noise. To Bob it sounded just like a heard of cattle stampeding in the direction of the camp. All three who heard the noise sat bolt upright, when suddenly the noise came to a dead stop. The next morning they heard a similar sound, much more distant, and one of the vaqueros said it was a tree falling. "But there was no breeze, no wind," says Bob, who to this day doesn't believe it was a tree.

Before Ray's death, Rosemary Nugent often camped and hiked alone. But since Ray's death, she hasn't done so. She now fears if she were bitten by a large rattlesnake, she might lack the muscle coordination to hike back to

her car or to drive herself to help. But if she now sees more of "a real need for teamwork," she certainly hasn't given up backpacking in wilderness areas, nor has anyone else who made that trip to La Grulla Meadow. Says Glen Conklin,"If you had a friend who was killed in an automobile accident, would you stop driving? If somebody was killed in a plane crash, would you not use planes anymore? For some period of time --maybe an hour, a day, or a month — you're a little more cautious. But you invariably get back."

Since Ray's death, everyone in the group has done some research on snakebite. They've read repeatedly that the best treatment is administration of antivenin, which can't be done practically by a backpacker; the antivenin is best dripped intravenously under carefully controlled conditions. The medical literature also agrees that the symptoms of rattlesnake bites vary tremendously. About the only thing common to all victims is the fang marks. Just as varied is the advice that has been given over the years on the best first aid to administer in the absence of a hospital. Once people were advised to make many little cut marks, but now some experts say not to cut at all. One widespread recommendation was to apply ice to the bite mark, but that too has been discredited. The role of tourniquets is also hotly disputed.

To air some of the debate, Ray's widow and five children asked at the time of Ray's death that any memorial contributions be sent to the San Diego Natural History Museum, which offered to sponsor a symposium on snakebite.

Everyone who was on the La Grulla expedition looks forward to such a symposium. They would like to learn about something else they could have done to save Ray's life. If any of them were ever in the wilderness again and the same thing were to happen, they would like not to feel that appalling sense of helplessness, of impotence. They would like to continue to think that careful, informed human beings can take care of themselves, no matter what. The La Grulla trip taught them otherwise — Jeannette De Wyze

White finds her work as frustrating as it is rewarding. "It's almost like having a cure for cancer that no one will take. Every day there are more and more homeless pets. The saddest thing is that if everyone would spay and neuter their dogs tomorrow it would be all over with. We would have solved the entire pet-overpopulation crisis."

Despite the overwhelming amount of unclaimed dogs, rescue coordinators take as much time as they need in placing an animal in a new home. "I have refused placement for different reasons," says Zimmer. "It's difficult, because if you refuse someone for something, what happens is they just learn what to say to the next person. It's best to educate them and talk to them about whether or not [a certain breed] is the right dog for them.'

Zimmer recently steered one family away from adopting a ridgeback. "They wanted to get a ridgeback for their daughter, who is very active and athletic and really wanted a dog. My gut instinct is, don't get a dog for a teenaged girl, because then they get into boys." Zimmer was concerned about what might happen four years from now when the young woman left for college. "Then the dog is five, and you have at least seven more years with the dog." She was also wary of placing a large, active dog into a home with three children under five years of age. "It's doable, but it's a lot of work. Ridgebacks are very active dogs, and it can be a lot to manage three little kids and their schedule and the dog's.

Rather than refusing the family's request to adopt a ridgeback, Zimmer insisted they "go to people's houses and interact with ridgebacks that are comfortable in their environment." After visiting the home of a friend who happened to have a ridgeback, the family came to the conclusion that it was "a lot of dog" for their small children, and they instead chose to adopt a 20-pound terrier.

"We don't adopt to people that have young children," says Ann Pollock, director of Chihuahua Rescue. "Chihuahuas are little, so people think 'little kids,' but we have seen so many [Chihuahuas with] broken bones because kids either step on them or they drop them. We try to be diplomatic about it, but people get upset because they have their heart set on it so they'll just buy it from a breeder,



and we'll end up with it a year later anyway." Chihuahuas have risen in popularity since they began to appear as fashion accessories for Britney Spears and Paris Hilton. Pollock cautions teens against treating the small creatures as accessories. One girl recently brought in an eight-ounce puppy that she had "carried around in her purse for two days and never thought to feed it or give it water." The puppy died of malnutrition.

Many dogs that are bred in puppy mills or smuggled illegally from Mexico are high risk for genetic disorders and deadly diseases. "Some of these dogs are never let out of their cages and never see the light of day," says White. "People bring up puppies from Mexico that have parvo [a viral disease that attacks the digestive system], which is highly contagious, and sell them outside of swap meets and on streets and in newspapers. Every week we get at least one phone call from someone saying, 'My dog has parvo.' It's an ugly, nasty disease; you don't want to

see your dog die that way. It's painful, it's bloody, and it's awful."

At the adoption event, Zimmer is hoping to find a home for Luna, an 11-month-old "ridgeless" ridgeback. Approximately 10 percent of ridgebacks are born without the telltale tuft of fur along their spines. "About 50 percent of those are euthanized the moment they are born," Zimmer says. "Luna is very playful, very sweet, and knows absolutely nothing. She's all puppy in an adult dog body.



Popular as a ground cover for concealing and stabilizing road cuts or any other easily eroded slope, ice plant covers the shoreline bluffs at La Jolla, road embankments in Rancho Santa Fe and Balboa Park, and front and back yards from Point Loma to El Cajon.

Tree Heights can be easily measured this week if the sun shines at midday. On or near February 18, at or very near 12 noon, the sun as seen from San Diego County stands at an altitude of 45 degrees above the horizon. Under those conditions, the length of a shadow cast by a vertical tree trunk on a horizontal surface equals the height of the tree trunk. Even if you lack measuring tape, you can still use your own feet to pace the distance heel-to-toe: the length of an average adult male's shoe sole, for example, is very close to one foot.

Very Low Tides on a string of days this week coincide with optimum times of day for tidepooling. On Thursday, February 15, the tide falls to a low of -1.4 feet at 2:10 p.m. On Friday, February 16, the tide drops to -1.6 feet (nearly as low as it ever gets) at 2:42 p.m. Again, on Saturday, February 17, the tide falls to -1.6 feet at 3:14 p.m. Sunday afternoon's low tide of -1.3 feet occurs at 3:45 p.m. Plenty of rocky stretches of coastline for tidepool gazing are available throughout the county, in-cluding Cabrillo National Monument, north Pacific Beach, and La Iolla.



A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND I BY JERRY SCHAD

he California Riding and Hiking Trail, a designated, regional multi-use (hiking/biking/equestrian) trail that strikes a southwest-to-northeast course through the middle of San Diego County, is still a work in progress. Most of the trail is open for public use, but some sections have access problems where the trail crosses private property. The southern half of the trail wends its way through the Jamul, Alpine, and Descanso areas, and eventually passes into Cuyamaca

Rancho State Park. The particularly pleasant

on a chilly winter morning, when

stretch of the California Riding and Hiking Trail described here is open to the public. It will take you two miles downhill, with a loss of 900 feet of elevation, into beautiful Sloan Canyon, where a riparian strip of vegetation accompanies the winding Sweetwater River. Try this hike (or ride) early neckerspot butterfly, Sloan Canyon

beams of light from the rising sun scatter amid dew droplets or ice crystals clinging to the tips of the chaparral vegetation.

To reach the starting point, exit Interstate 8 at Tavern Road in Alpine, and follow Tavern Road 2.7 miles south to Dehesa Road on the right and Japatul Road straight ahead. Continue 0.3 mile east on Japatul Road, and turn right on Sequan Truck Trail (a paved road), After 2.8 miles, the pavement ends. Continue 0.2 mile to a sharp right bend in the road and park where you can find the space to do so.

Walk south on Sequan Truck Trail for 0.25 mile past some houses, then follow the signed California Riding and Hiking Trail as it diverges to the left and descends sharply along a south-facing slope. Sloan Canyon lies below, and beyond it you'll see the broad, north slope of Sycuan Peak (pronounced "Sequan") rearing into the sky above. Uncut by roads, the north flank of the mountain wears its thick chaparral naturally, like a shaggy variegated carpet. Other high points in the field of view are the rocky summits of Lyons, Lawson, and Gaskill peaks to the southeast.

After 1.3 miles, the trail joins a spur road. A messy collection of rural houses lies to the left, down below in Sloan Canvon. You go right and pass above an intriguing (but privately owned) little gorge where the Sweetwater River has cut its



Dr. Bass, a world-renowned forensic anthropologist, founded the University of Tennessee's Anthropology Research Facility the Body Farm - a quarter-century ago. A CONVERSATION WITH THE **AUTHORS:**

Jon Jefferson had stopped by Bill Bass's home in Knoxville to take my phone call before they headed off to read from and discuss their new book at a local bookstore. Each part of the writing team was on a cordless phone in a different part of Dr. Bass's home. I began by asking Dr. Bass about his work at the University of Tennessee's Anthropology Research Facility.

"I first learned about the Body Farm in Mary Roach's book. Stiff. Who else has written about your work?"

'The first major publication that talked about the work was Patricia Cornwell's book called, The Body Farm, Before she was a writer, she worked for the Virginia medical examiner's office, and I'd known her for years.

"After her book came out, people started calling the university wanting to know the number for the Body Farm. There's no use to call out there. of course. because everybody's dead.

'Then, Jon comes along and does two one-hour documentaries on us for the National Geographic channel, which have been very popular. It's been mentioned in many scientific and popular books as well."

"Was the idea of having

this research site yours, originally?"

"I taught for 11 years for the University of Kansas, Lawrence, and I identified skeletal remains for law enforcement agencies there, but don't ever remember getting a maggot-covered body. I came here to the University of Tennessee June 1 of 1971 – almost 36 years ago now – to take over a three-person department that was an undergraduate program only.

"I knew the medical examiner here and he asked me if I'd serve as a forensic anthropologist to the medical examiner's staff. He notified the 95 medical examiners in Tennessee that they had a forensic anthropol-

Tennessee that this was a good idea?"

"No. sir. not at all. The Dean just picked up the university phone book, found the person on the University Agriculture Campus that handled land, and told him what I wanted. It was nine years later that business was picking up and we moved all the bodies from the sow barn to the couple-of-acres facility we have now in back of the University of Tennessee Hospital."

"In the novel you write about run-ins with creationists. Have you actually had runins with people concerning your work?

From the other phone, Jon Jefferson responds, "We thought this scientific debate was settled decades ago, right here in Tennessee at the Scopes trial. But, this same issue keeps circling around again. It isn't driven by science; it's driven by beliefs that aren't based on science. People kind of twist and distort things to fit their belief system. The conflict in the book over creationism, or Intelligent Design, doesn't reflect an actual incident, it's more an attempt to weigh in on that issue. We try in the book to tell a good story and to entertain readers, but we'd like to educate people a little bit in a relatively painless way.

"Jon, when did you first meet Dr. Bass?"

"About seven years ago, I was reading an article in the Saturday newspaper about a training that a group of FBI agents had come to Knoxville for. They were digging up bodies from a simulated mass grave. There had actually been a case where a couple of DEA agents had been murdered in Mexico and they used that same scenario to train these agents on how to excavate bodies and how to interpret the evidence within the grave. 



house talent buyer, intends to bring up to eight headliners a month to the 700-seat theater that once hosted the Red Hot Chili Peppers.

Other former rock rooms do not show as much promise.

SDSU's Aztec Center was a new-music mecca in the '70s and '80s. The downstairs, Hall could rock again, but promoters have opted to use venues that are better suited for music.

The Police reunited on February 11, but they won't return to their first SD venue; in August 1978, the band made its local debut at the 600-seat Roxy Theater in Pacific Beach.



"It went away because the post office wanted the property," says longtime production assistant Louie Procaccino. He says the Roxy brought in Dire Straits, the Boomtown Rats, and Peter Tosh between '78 and '83.

The Adams Avenue Theater is now a fabric store, but in the '80s it was SD's punk palace.

"[Casbah co-owner] Tim Mays did a show called More Core in '84," recalls Procaccino. The Blasters, X, and local punk pioneers the Penetrators played the 500-capacity theater. Harlan Schiffman was arrested at a Social Distortion show he promoted there. ("They claimed we didn't have a permit for the event," says Schiffman. "It was thrown out of court.") "They just didn't want

punk shows to go on there," says Procaccino. "It started getting harder to get permits from police and fire [departments].'

Procaccino recalls when the Clash played downtown's Golden Hall in '78: "The band kept kicking the stage monitors out into the crowd. I had to go out and get them back. Joe Strummer told me, 'I've been watching you, and I think you are a bit of a brute. I think I should thrash you myself.' I said, 'Bring it on, you limey bastard.' Boston, the Grateful Dead, Prince, the Kinks, Neil Young, Tom Petty, and Aerosmith have played Golden Hall or the adjacent Civic Theatre, but promoters now tend to avoid them partly because they must hire a costly union crew.

The California Theatre (on the same block as 4th & B) turns 80 this year, but its future is unclear. In the '80s, the 1400-seat theater hosted Lou Reed, Journey, Jimmy Cliff, PiL, Cheap Trick, Motörhead, and the Cramps.

"They called the riot squad when the Dead Kennedys played there," Procaccino remembers. "There were two busloads of cops in riot gear. They were down on punk.

. Brad Richter, a planner with the Centre City Development Corporation, says the theater is designated as a historic building and that it would be difficult to get permission to tear it down. Recent plans to incorporate it into a highrise development fell through. - Ken Leighton

For the second Simmons comic, IDW is looking for contributors and paying \$250 for scripts ("plus five comp







Under the name LSD Productions ("it stands for Local San Diego"), for the past two years Bluntz has put on about two shows a month at Fannie's. He says he's never charged a cover.

"Even a \$2 cover charge will scare people off. Paying for the Battalion of Saints to come play was worth it just to see everybody's reaction that it was free. Besides, if I had a cover charge I'd have to pay for a bouncer at the door.

At Fannie's, Bluntz functions as sound tech and says "the cops leave us alone" because the shows have been largely problem-free even though they "operate without security." Except for Battalion of Saints and a few other bands from out of

town, bands that play LSD shows don't get paid. "I tell them up front they

get a couple pitchers of beer. If they can't hang with that, then I tell them I can't afford them.... If you start charging people, fewer people will show up.^{*}

Bluntz doesn't advertise Fannie's.

"This is more for East County people who don't want to drive too far. DUIs can be brutal."

On Saturday six bands play Fannie's: CDM, the Noise Gods, the Experiments, 12 Cent, the Gizzards, and Solis.

We just picked up our new van. It's a 2001 15-seater with 50,000 miles."

He says the Orange Peal hookup came about "after one of the guys from the label saw us at a show at House of Blues. [Orange Peal] has good national distribution." Glen Schwartz, director of A&R for Orange Peal, says indie labels aren't feeling the

sales pinch as much as major labels are. "We haven't been as affected [by music downloading]. The only thing that hurt us was Tower Records closing. They were really starting to support indie labels. But larger chains like the Best Buys and the FYEs are starting to buy from indies."

"Everyone was either fighting, puking, or making out," says Two Word Name guitarist Dag Stylez of the "party bus" to and from the band's January 25 gig at L.A.'s Whiskey a Go Go. For \$35, around 150 riders were

promised a keg of beer, show tickets, and a stripper pole.

"Some people were pissed that we oversold it - totally by accident — but five or six people had to stand the whole way. Then, in the first five minutes, someone took a dump and stank up the whole bus. Then the air conditioning broke, a

window was busted, and, to top it off, the keg ran out about halfway to L.A."

He says the bus riders got into the gig, though some ended up bounced "One

guy was way too drunk he should have been kicked out — and there was a girl who passed out on the bar."

The band paid \$1000 for the bus rental and driver ("It's usually \$1250, but I know the guy who owns it"), plus money for gas, a keg of beer, and several bottles of vodka.

"We made our money back on the bus, but we didn't sell all our [show]

Hren says the group has been forced to cancel "over a dozen shows, at several hundred dollars each. We were booked for Carvin guitar's big anniversary bash with Lit at their corporate headquarters and factory in Carmel Mountain. We were in all the ads, but they wouldn't let us play with a fill-in [bassist].'

He says the departure is just the latest instance of a "black cloud" following the band, citing a recent evening at the Epicentre as an example. "We presold \$1200 in tickets, tons of people showed up, we load[ed] in, and they canceled the show because they couldn't get a real soundman. They wouldn't let us touch the gear, even though we know how to run sound. We even offered to bring in a big PA, but they shot it down."

Guitarist Sam Roberson says, "They rebooked us a while later, on a weeknight, but they offered no promotion, and it was near impossible to convince people to buy tickets again and drive down again.

Off Track are now in their tenth year and debuted new bassist Jimmy Zadai in December 2006.





"You are in the presence of Mon Cul, prince of baboons," Tom Robbins wrote in Another Roadside Attraction. "Mon Cul has been around the world and met everybody twice. He is better educated than you or I, and is the only creature on earth, man or beast, who knows an English word that rhymes with orange."

I wonder if Mick Overman has ever read Roadside Attraction. In his bio, he makes reference to what he calls the "periodically repeated 'rule' that nothing in the English language rhymes with orange." Aside from Overman, the only other place I'd ever heard of the impossible matchup with "orange" was in Robbins's very funny novel. But Overman seems serious. "I have an affinity," he continues, "for breaking rules and exposing myths.

Mick Overman is a singer-songwriter based in Santa Cruz; the earnest spark in his voice belies both the age and the miles. He patterns a bit after Stephen Stills as a guitarist, and he's credible as well with a blues man's pinkie slide. His latest CD, Good Thing Happen, is a collection of acoustic symphonies written to the minor devils of heartache, selfpity, and sorrow: "Went to

my doctor and he said/ Boy, you gotta get over it just let her go/ I says. Doc. tell me something I don't already know." Maudlin, perhaps, but Overman's songs are sculpted with the kind of truth and precision that comes not from the imagination but from vears and experience. There's a kindly hint of John Hiatt lurking in the background of Over-







Oh, Oysters, Come and Walk with Us

Oh, woe! Here comes Mardi Gras, and there are no new Cajun-Creole restaurants to review this year. Lots of New Orleans chefs and cooks arrived after Katrina — welcome, come on in — but none have opened their own restaurants yet. Still, there is an amiable new seafood joint that does some vaguely Cajun styling on a few dishes and is less pricey than others in its neighborhood. The location will certainly put you into the heart of the local action on Fat Tuesday, Zaftig Friday, or Pleasingly Plump Saturday — whenever the Gaslamp population swells with Carnival revelers.

"Oysters" was the magic word that brought me to Ocean Room. My friend Sam spotted the sign announcing their presence to the street. Would I like to go gobble some? Oh, boy — sensual mouthfeel, mineral jolt of brine and oceanic protein, just what my soul's doctor ordered. An oyster a day...Yes! I said, yes!

The restaurant has a long wraparound bar for eating and drinking, the outer corner occupied that evening by a group of attractive young women evidently having a nibble after work. (If it was *before* work, I don't want to hear about it.) We were seated in a comfortable leather(ette?) booth by the window, our party a multinational concern, with origins in Australia (Sheila, the flying nurse), Austria, Colorado, Chicago (Sam), and New York/Frisco (me) — we were seafood lovers all.

Three oyster varieties were available on the halfshell — Fanny Bay (British Columbia), Malpeque (Prince Edward Island), and Blue Point (Long Island). We ordered one of each per person. They come with a twist on the standard cocktail sauce (with tequila and a bit of white wine replacing Worcestershire and Tabasco), plus a vinaigrette with a touch of soy, a variation on ponzu sauce. The big, briny Fanny Bays were so good they didn't need sauce. The other two varieties were smaller, and less exciting. They did need sauce. I kind of wished for a bottle of Tabasco or Louisiana Red on the table to add a little extra spark.

I cleave to the myth that, like celery, oysters have fewer calories than it takes to digest them. At about ten calories apiece, they're almost impossible to fill up on. (One night in New Orleans, I downed two dozen at the bar during an endless wait for a table at Pascal's Manale — and was still hungry for dinner.) So we ordered appetizers, too. Under "cocktails" we found Salmon Piña Co-

lada and Ahi Poké. The salmon was less lively than we'd hoped for. Cubes of the fish, cooked by marination in citrus (like ceviche), were soft textured and mild tasting, surrounded by coconut milk, fresh lime juice, and diced mango, with multicol-

ored "root chips" on the side. The mixture was pleasant but not riveting. Even semi-raw, you could taste that this was farm-raised Atlantic salmon rather than the firmer

but more costly wild Pacific catch. Ahi Poké on seaweed salad with mango, apple, and (invisible) pine nuts was also vaguely pleasant — mainly just raw tuna and soy. The best poké has more kick.

After enjoying the Fanny Bays so much, we gambled on Oysters Rockefeller, reputedly invented during the Gilded Age at Antoine's in New Orleans — baked oysters gratinéed with hollandaise sauce on the half-shells, over a spinach mixture. At Ocean Room, these were probably Malpeques, the chef's favorite. (The Fanny Bays would actually be a little closer in size and flavor to the Gulf Coast's big, juicy Apalachicolas.) The spinach mixture needed more anise-y Herbsaint or Pernod liqueur to flavor it — at least enough to taste — and I'm not sure whether the topping included the classic hollandaise along with cream and cheese. But the oysters were still moist, so it was an okay rendition. Mussels *marinière*, though, were close to wonderful, in a great if salty broth of white wine,

herbs, and a touch of cream. Bread comes along for dipping. If the mussels hadn't been a few seconds overcooked, the flavors would have been sublime. With this single ex-

ception, the seafood at Ocean Room was consistently tender, cooked precisely to the optimum point.

A couple of New Orleans-style seafood dishes are satisfying, even though the kitchen uniformly tunes the seasoning to far less than typical Louisiana levels. Cajun Pasta offers shrimp, scallops, calamari, clams, mussels, and andouille sausage tossed with fettuccine in a light cream sauce. The advertised "Cajun spices" are barely detectable — and believe me, if you ate the Cajun-Creole original, you'd detect them. Think of this, instead, as a good creamy Italian *pasta pescatore* — no shocks or revelations, just comfort and sensuality. The "traditional New Orleans" combo pan roast isn't

exactly traditional. It offers crab, oysters, and shrimp robed in a rich, herbal, tomato-cream sauce with rice mixed in. It bears no resemblance to the dish of that name that Pascal's Manale is famous for but may actually be tastier than Manale's, if you want to savor seafood rather than bread crumbs and béchamel sauce.

A pair of "signature dishes" rarely found on the same menu are bouillabaisse and cioppino — two very different seafood stews from neighboring Mediterranean regions of France and Italy. The bouillabaisse is the more delicate. This kitchen's rendition is not exactly French, because the seafood species are too different, subtly tilting the flavor balance. In Marseilles. the stew consists heavily of "trash catch" (like — ha ha! — monkfish, which sells for a princely sum nowadays). Here, the protein content was shellfish, making for a more elegant but less authentic and hearty broth. I imagine that many local diners will prefer this "unfishy" rendi-





tion. I missed the rouille (red pepper aioli on baguette croutons), which, although so easy to whirl up in the Cuisi, is a consistent omission locally. Again, every species in the bowl was tender - not always the case in restaurant bouillabaisses, even those from better-known chefs.

The cioppino was both more robust and more controversial. Sheila and I were astonished to discover that we'd both participated in the "secret ceremony" of the Bay Area's professional crab fishermen — the annual cioppino feast. She's been to the one in Half Moon Bay, I've gone twice to the one in Pacifica. These feasts are held by and for

the crabbers and their kin, with maybe 30 tickets sold to outsiders, all the cheap red wine you can drink included in the price. So both of us could compare Ocean Room's cioppino — in a heavy, herbal tomato sauce with the Sicilian red-sauce version of the Bay Area crabmen.

This seems awfully coarse,' said Sheila, in her crisp accent. "I actually find it more delicate than the Pacifica rendition," I argued. "In Pacifica, it tasted like they poured a gallon of Gallo Hearty Burgundy into ten gallons of canned tomatoes and cooked it all down." "But there's quite a lot of dried basil in here,' she said. "There, it was a huge amount of garlic," I recalled. All in all, I liked this version, as much for the festive memories it evoked as for itself. I suspect that Ocean Room's cioppino may be tastier than Pacifica's -

it's rustic, all right, but a bit more refined. All it's missing are the great shoals of fresh Dungeness crab, which I did miss. (At Ocean Room, mixed shellfish substitute, as they typically do in Italy's original versions of the dish.)

Finfish are scantily present on the menu. There's seared ahi, blackened snapper, mahi mahi in caper cream sauce, and our choice, an ambitious specialty of steamed salmon wrapped in banana leaves, marinated with achiote-honey paste, served with jasmine rice and asparagus spears. This was cooked to just the tender point, but the farmed fish was mushy and mild in flavor. We all picked at it but soon lost interest. The recipe is good, but this quality of "catch" hardly deserves the effort. The restaurant obtains its seafood from a large wholesaler in Los Angeles. Even though it's delivered daily,

it isn't the sparkling fresh-offthe-boat local catch that some high-end restaurants serve. (But it won't cost you as much either.)

Despite my reservations about Ocean Room, I certainly enjoyed my dinner there. No, it's not foodie heaven, but it's a good spot to relax over a bite or a meal with companions. We could hear each other talk, and we didn't have to stop the conversation while a waiter pontificated about the wonders emerging from the kitchen. Sometimes you don't want a temple of haute cuisine, merely an easygoing "place for folks to - especially if there are meet" oysters involved and Mardi Gras coming up. Next thing you know, you may be dancing in the street.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Ocean Room has been in busi-

ness for about five months. It's part of a Gaslamp restaurant group that includes Asti, Max's New York (a steakhouse), Chianti (formerly Mar e Monte), and La Fiesta. Chef Felix Frias comes from Vera Cruz, a port town famed for its exquisite seafood cookery, including the classic local dish Huachinango Veracruzana. He moved with his family to San Diego when he was about 9 years old. As soon as he was old enough, he began to work in restaurants, learning to cook on the job. "I've been in the business for almost 15 years. I've been working in Asti Restaurant, Max's, in all the restaurants of this group. My main thing was Italian. In the last 10 years I've been working for this company — George Herman is the owner - and I've been working with good chefs. My

teachers were Jeff Barr and Raul de Castillo, who's still with the company. They saw my skills, and they gave me the opportunity. I've been reading and traveling around the country, learning all the time.

"A lot of the dishes we serve are classic recipes that have been around for many years, like the bouillabaisse and cioppino, and the New Orleans dishes. We travel around, taste other people's. All you can do is put your own little special flavors to make them your own style. But you've got to have respect for the people who made those dishes [first].

"I'm very passionate about the food. I love to cook, to make people happy. I tell all my crew, including the waiters, 'Make everybody feel like they're at Disneyland — happy to be here.' "∎

This Deal's Out **Of the Park**

"Can you believe it?" Hank says. "The Yankee Clipper's shoes."

ee?" says Hank.

The black spiked shoes stand there behind thick glass, inset into the wall. Joe DiMaggio, New York Yankees 1941. These

are the actual spikes that were worn during his 56-game hitting streak," says the plaque below.

[°]Can you believe it?" Hank "The Yankee Clipper's says. shoes."

"Great," I say. I look around at the marble walls and leather chairs. "Can we go now?"

It's nearly six. Hank's just hauled us into the lobby of the Omni hotel, down by the ballpark.

"Go? My good man, we've come here to eat."

"Are you out to lunch? Us? Here?" "Trust me. You pay the drinks, I pay the food.

Deal?"

What's wrong with this picture? Here we are in the palace built for millionaire Padres players and their rich groupies. Through the door to the restaurant, I see split-level, curved walls, blond wood, brushed steel, timber floors, fancy stairs, Ushaped bar...I mean, come on.

Still, I'm a sucker for a "trust me" offer like this, if only to find out from which direction the sucker punch is gonna come.

"Okay, I'm crazy too," I tell Hank. "Let's do it."

We walk into the restaurant, McCormick & Schmick's. We sit at the bar. Rich, red, teaky polished wood. Dave, the barman, comes up.

"Gentlemen?" Hank looks to me. "Uh, beer," I say. "Draft?"

Dave reels off a bunch of fancy names. I don't

hear Bud. I don't hear Pabst Blue Ribbon. So I settle on that Escondido brewery's

> Stone IPA. Hank orders a bottled water. Sounds innocent enough. Pellegrino. 'Course I don't ask the price.

What's the point? I can't afford it anyway.

. 'See anyone you know?" says Hank. The joker.

This is bizman schmoozeland. A guy farther down the bar says to his buddy, "The day he sold it, he became the ninth richest man in the country. Next year we're projected at \$200 million...'

Sigh. I look at Hank.

Your move," I say.

Hank signals Dave.

"The, uh, \$1.95 happy hour menu, please." Wha...?

"Comin' right up," Dave says. He hauls out a sheet of green paper.

My giddy aunt. At the top of the page, guess what it says? "\$1.95 Happy Hour Menu, Monday thru Friday 4:00 p.m.-6:30 p.m."

'What's the catch?" I say. But there's plenty to eat, and not just wimpy snacks. Like, "Half-pound cheeseburger served with French fries, tomato, onion, and a pickle."

Half-pound? Buck ninety-five? Here? They also have steamed mussels in white wine and garlic, buffalo wings, potato skins, breaded zucchini, an "imported international cheese plate" — ten dishes in all.

"Gimme the chicken satay," Hank says to Dave, "and the California rolls and the fish cakes."

Okay. Three plates for him, three for me. "Cheeseburger," I say, "mussels, and the cheese plate.'

What I like is how Dave doesn't seem to mind us pushing the envelope here. He has to know we're not going to be ordering Pisco Sours or ---whoa! - a \$14.00 glass of Kendall Jackson Cab-Sauv. But he's cheerful about the whole thing.

"We do this happy hour everywhere," he says. "We started in Portland, Oregon. Now we have 86 restaurants around the country. I guess it works.

And, wouldn't you know it, soon I'm ordering another Stone IPA. Even though I found out it's \$4.41, plus tax. Hank's fancy water was \$4.00. This time he orders an iced tea (\$3.75, but you get refills).

Soon we're heads down into the chow. Oh God, it's good. For starters, you get cloth napkins, heavy flatware, muy elegante china. And yes, the burger's real. A half-pounder, with a nice clump of chunky fries. Hank lets me in on one each of his two fish cakes (with a delicious aioli sauce), the five chicken satay (arranged like a star, with spicy peanut sauce and arty swirls of soy all over the plate), plus four plump California rolls, with pink ginger and green wasabi, on their own square white dish.

I give him half the burger and fries in return, plus bits of the cheeses and mussels.

It's a lot of food. Those "international cheeses" are four logs of pepperjack and multiple slices of what Dave says is Swiss but Hank swears is Gouda. Whatever, they go well with the graham crackers.

A manager, Fernando, comes around checking customer satisfaction. Have to ask him if John Moores, the Padres' owner, still has the penthouse upstairs. "Oh yes," he says, "he comes down all the time for breakfast, in his own special booth."

The mussel bowl becomes a battleground, they're so darned delish. I get a spoon, just so I can slurp up the broth.

I mean, as Hank later says, not everything was out of this world, flavor-wise - the burger, for instance, was a wee bit dry - but the whole deal is nice, fresh, elegant, clubby, friendly, and hey, did I mention \$1.95?

In the end, for our four drinks I pay out maybe 17 bucks. Foodwise, Hank owes about 16, for wow! Did we eat all that? - eight dishes. Oh yeah. I couldn't help ordering the plate of three potato skins with cheese and bacon and sour cream, and Hank went and got the buffalo wings, eight of them, with a blue-cheese dressing. Now, if we'd been frugal we could have just nursed a Coke (\$2.75) and stuck with the burgers. Five bucks each. Somehow, though, as we walk out past Joe DiMaggio's shoes, I feel positively uplifted. It was such a deal.

"Was that a home run or what?" says Hank. "Out of the park, old buddy. Out of the park."



A Community **Of Tasters**

"Wines that sell for \$65 to \$90 off the mailing list routinely fetch \$400 to \$500 a bottle on the secondary market."

'm sorry, I can't drink this wine," said Steve. "Apparently, it doesn't exist." It was a fine, knowing joke: confronted with a 1995 Laboure-Roi Clos de la Roche (a well-regarded red Burgundy), Steve had pulled out his

Palm pilot, tapped into the eRobertParker.com ratings database, and discovered the awful truth: apparently, neither the Mr. Parker nor his Burg-friendly Assistant had rated the wine. And if there's no rating — really, how certain can a devotee of Mr. Parker's website be that it even

exists, all sensory evidence notwithstanding? But it was a joke; Steve was more than happy to drink the Laboure-Roi, as well as any number of the other Pinots that had been brought to that evening's eRobert Parker offline tasting at Savory in Encinitas. The lineup was remarkable for its range of age, style, and provenance. After an opening round of bubbly, we got things started with a Mount Eden Vineyards Pinot from...1975. A wine old enough to recall the man who planted Mount Eden's vineyards, pioneering winemaker Martin Ray. (Wine connoisseur Julian Street once

telegrammed Ray that "your Pinot 1936...is first



American red wine I ever drank with entire pleasure," and Ray's ashes were scattered among the vines.) It stank like rotten rhubarb when it first splashed into the glass, but lo and behold - after a few minutes, everyone was giving it credit

for its tannin and acidity. Then, to quote the tasting note left on the board by attendee Aidan: "Leave it longer still, and a curious, blackfruited sweetness came out, like dried figs or old raisins...it drank well continuously.'

It was a wine of special interest to the offline's organizer,

David Brown. Brown is 26 and has been dabbling in wine for only about a year. "I just found it really neat, how it evolved in the glass. I've never had that experience. I've never had that much old wine before; it was really eye-opening." And that, for Brown, is the point of these offlines: experience of the sort you might otherwise never obtain. "I don't care about how much the wine costs; I don't care about how expensive the dinner is. It's about how much I can learn from these people, because most of them have been doing it for as long as I've been alive. And people are willing to bring wines that I might otherwise never

have a chance to drink."

The Mount Eden was one such rarity; the next wine was another: Domaine Romanee-Conti Grands Echezeaux 1997. DRC is something of a holy grail for Pinot lovers in general and red Burgundy lovers in particular, and here it was, one bottle among many — the grand superfluity of oenophiles. For me, it was the highlight of the evening, if only for the way it married richness and delicacy, its wondrous flavors carried almost carelessly along. (Somebody take the glass away from the wine columnist.)

Because of what he might learn, Brown doesn't mind splurging on whatever bottle he brings to the table, and his offering for the Savory offline made that clear: an Omega Pinot Noir from Sine Qua Non, possibly the ne plus ultra of cult California wineries. Wines that sell for \$65 to \$90 off the mailing list routinely fetch \$400 to \$500 a bottle on the secondary market. Brown found his at auction (he got a good deal); a spot on the list is still a long way off. "The waiting list is about five years long right now. I do have a half-dozen bottles of SQN in my cellar - all secondary purchase." Another board member "has been very kind to me, selling it just above list price." For now, "It's kind of 'Sit and wait and be patient and go to pay-it-forward offlines while I can.'

Pay-it-forward refers to people who are not on the list attending a dinner hosted by people who are on the list. "It's very common. There's a rolling offline for another Pinot, Kosta Browne - they do mostly Sonoma and Russian River wines. There are a lot of different themes that people have on the board." Varietal themes like the Pinot offline are common, and Brown is pulling together a Rhone offline for February. "I don't have a lot of experience with Rhone wines, so what better way to learn more about it? I already have a waiting list." (That last bit might be



surprising to some - San Diego does not have a robust reputation when it comes to these sorts of events. But, says Brown, "I think there is a community; I think they were lacking someone who was crazy enough - or who had time enough - to organize it. I think the interest is there.")

As it is, says Brown, "because there are 18 people coming, there was talk of doubling up the bottles. But then, I'm thinking, that's 36 bottles of wine. To me, that seems a little unnecessary. This morning, I decided to post and say, 'Eight people, or couples, are going to bring two bottles of red, four couples are bringing two bottles of white, and then four are bringing a single bottle of Sauternes for the foie gras course.' I feel like

it kind of cuts down on the waste — I really can't stand to waste wine. It's not about, 'Oh, I brought this' — it's about having enough wine for everybody to drink without wasting it."

That mindset was made visible at Savory - the evening included some memorably unopened bottles. Sea Smoke's "Ten," a Bondi Home Ranch from Martinelli, and Brown's magnum of SQN Omega. After a certain point, no one wanted to open them just to open them. Steve even gave Brown a piece of advice, suggesting that he need not bring something so grand to an offline. "You don't need to impress us," he said. "That was probably the best piece of feedback I got that night," said Brown afterwards. "It made me realize that, as much as a lot of the people who are involved in wine treat it as a status symbol, people like Steve...make it a lot more real. It lets you know that they're really passionate about it. It lets you know that people are not just about what's on the label. I really appreciate comments like that; it's the kind of feedback that helps you grow. Because of the name and the size of the bottle, it can kind of come off like I'm the new guy trying to impress people, even though I wasn't trying to do that."

NORTH COASTAL

The Armenian Cafe 3126 Carlsbad Boulevard (at Pine), Carlsbad 760-720-2233. At this large cottage with a vear-round heated sundeck overlooking Highway 101, the menu offers Armenian specialties cooked with a Lebanese accent as well as generic Mid-dle Eastern crowd pleasers, including gyros made from scratch. Lamb shish kebab is the house specialty, a "loss leader featuring tender premium lamb cubes with assertive seasonings, grilled over gas Even better are distinctive dishes from the owner's family recipes: his mom's Lebanese kibbe (a large, glorified nutfilled lamb meatball) is outstanding, as is her *kashta lea* dessert — an exotic nutmeg sponge cake fragrant with rosewater syrup, topped with pistachios and thickened cream. Dinner platters constitute a full meal, including a great "Armenian salad" and a tasty dip for the meat, along with less-than-great egg-lemon soup, pi-laf, and pita wedges. Wine list is dreary, but corkage fee is reasonable. Three meals daily. Live music and belly dancer Friday and Saturday night. Moderate to slightly expensive. - N.W. (8/03)

California Bistro 7100 Four Seasons Point, Four Seasons Resort Aviara, Carls-bad, 760-603-6868. This restaurant features fresh California cuisine in a beautiful, luxurious hotel dining room. Open 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday to Thursday (to 10:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday). Reserve for the Friday night seafood buffet (5:30 p.m. to 9 p.m.), which includes

cooked seafood, sushi, and sashimi. Moderate to expensive. - E.W. (7/00) Juanita's Taco Shop Estilo Tepatitlan 290 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-943-9612; also in Vista at 248 Main, 760-758-4531. Enticing aromas of fresh tortillas and fragrant frijoles greet you as you enter this busy little taqueria, where the food's cooked in the style of Tepatitlan, a small city near Guadalajara. Its local specialty is carni tas — which Juanita's does up (by the plate or by the pound) as tender, non-greasy shreds, served with fresh, cilantro-laden mild tomato *salsita*. Standard wraps are fine, too, and the beans taste as good as they smell. Try a "Flying Saucer" — it really takes off, with shredded meat, onions, mild chiles, beans sour cream, shredded orange cheese, and puréed guacamole riding high on an airy crisped flour tortilla. Open daily, three meals, until 3 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — N.W. (9/01)

Kealani's 137 West D Street, Encinitas, 760-94-ALOHA. Tucked between a 7-Eleven and a pizzeria, with an exterior sign that says "Saimin" (for Hawaii's ver-sion of Top Ramen), this island of the Islands prescribes "Living Da Aloha Spirit." A ukulele player sometimes serenades the noonday crowd at the side-walk tables, and at any hour the food is "plate lunch" — two scoops of short-grain rice, mild house-made macaroni salad, and a choice of authentic "grines." Don't miss the outstanding kalua pig, zesty, smoky shreds of imu-style roast pork, resembling a moister version of Southern "pulled pork." The menu covers the whole panoply of island stand dards, from malasadas (Portuguese donuts) to musubi (Spam sushi), with a Saturday special of a luau's worth of "lo-cal food." While you're waiting, check out the droll Hawaiian vocabulary lessons under the glass tops of the table Open Monday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. N.W. (10/01)

Milton's Deli Flower Hill Mall, 2660 Via de la Valle, Del Mar, 858-792-2225. This sprawling, family-friendly eatery started out as a non-kosher Jewish deli, but has come to embrace diner food, pub grub, and Italian and Mexican favorites, along with a full cast of Ashkenazi noshes. Sit down and stuff yourself with stuffed cabbage, overstuffed deli sand-wiches, crisp-skinned fat cheese blintzes, matzoh brei, hot brisket with latkes or chicken-fried steak, if that's your bag. Or take out from the attached deli and bakery. The yummy chopped liver will remind you of the Bronx, the smoked whitefish and silky Nova will take you home to Flatbush, but the soft, cottony bagels — *oy!*, so *goy!* Seven days, three meals. Inexpensive to low moderate. -N.W. (4/05)

The Original 101 Diner 552 First Street, Encinitas, 760-753-2123. This is where the caviar crowd from Rancho Santa Fe comes to remember their roots. It's got all the deliberately down-home cooking you could want, including allday breakfast ranging from really cheap biscuits and sausage gravy to a pretty cheap top sirloin steak and eggs. For lunch, the bacon-Cheddar burger with fruit is a good surprise combo. The turkey-cranberry salad sandwich is also good, and try the spinach salad, with bacon, feta cheese, olives, mushrooms, and chopped egg. Even though this 101's vintage (1983) in no way compares with the Oceanside 101 Café's (1928), it has become a genuine part of Encinitas life — lines on the weekends will tell you that. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. In-expensive. — *E.B.* (12/04)

Pamplemousse Grille 514 Via de la Valle, Solana Beach, 858-792-9090. The locals' favorite French provincial restaurant offers exquisite, creative cooking. Favorites from an often-changing menu include white fish served any style, mushroom *cappucini* soup, and *tarte Tatin*. Serene atmosphere with excellent service. Dinner reservations urged. Din-ner nightly, lunch Friday only. Dinners expensive. - E.W.

Pizza Port 135 North Highway 101 (at Lomas Santa Fe), Solana Beach, 858-481-7332. (Also in Carlsbad.) "Tasty Grub & Grog," says the sign, and that's just what it is. You come here for three things: the pizzas, the beer, and the scene. The place is cavernous, but the tables are communal, with long wooden benches. Rub shoulders with surfers, students yuppies, and locals. Pizza Port brews their own beer (try Sharkbite Red) and flings their own pizzas, New York style.

Filling combos can be great, like the pesto, mesquite-grilled chicken, sundried tomatoes, artichoke hearts, and feta ("Pizza Carlsbad"), or shrimp, clams, onions, olives, bell peppers, and mushrooms ("Pizza Solana"). Inexpensive. — $E_{B_1}(4/03)$


Poseidon 1670 Coast Boulevard (south of 18th Street), Del Mar, 858-755-9345. The two dining rooms and bar here boast airy, stylish decor and ocean views, and the SRO umbrellashaded patio is right at water's edge. Lunches run to sandwiches, burgers, and fried seafood of ordinary competence and uneven preparation: wonderfully coconutty fried shrimp, for example, share a sampler plate with deadly-dry salmon croquettes. Dinner dishes are modern Cal cuisine — that is, a mix-and-match of Pacific Rim-Mediterranean-Mexican flavors, with some emphasis on seafood. But the view's the thing here. Full bar. Open daily, lunch and dinner; breakfast on weekends. Moderate to expensive. - N.W. (4/05)

Roxy Natural Foods Restaurant 517 North Coast Highway 101 (at D Street), Encinitas, 760-436-5001. You don't have to be a Self Realization Fellowship follower to fit in in Encinitas, but it helps. Roxy was made for the veg-gie crowd who've grown up around the famous seaside compound. These days, that includes surfers, vegans, and even visiting Hollywood stars picky about their food. Actually, it is no longer strictly a vegetarian eatery: the owners have added chicken and fish for Encinitas's "new people" — the carnivores buying up property in the hills. But the veganveggie spirit still rules. Most popular item on the menu is owner Shahram Naimi's own invention: the scrumptious Roxy falafelburger. Its green "meat" is made from garbanzo beans, potatoes, onions, cilantro, and herbs, all bedded down with tomatoes, a thick mat of sprouts, and melted cheese, covered by a wholewheat bun. For chicken-lovers, the garlic chicken pizzas sell big-time. Other healthy treats include the three-egg avocado omelet with toast, the artichoke sandwich (with marinated artichoke hearts), and the squash enchilada dinner (steamed banana squash with corn, bell peppers, and low-fat cream cheese in a flour tortilla). Payoff? You come out feeling good and full, not bad and bloated. Open daily, brunch through dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

St. Germain's Cafe 1010 South Coast Highway 101 (at I Street), Encinitas, 760-753-5411. Despite the Parisian name, the food here is all-American. Omelets are the café's best-known dish — 14 variations of three-eggers (or Eggbeaters by request) served with toast or a muffin, plus tasty herb-strewn "café potatoes" or fresh fruit salad. But don't overlook the Belgian waffles, scrambles, pancakes, Louisiana sausages, or the three versions of expertly poached eggs Benedict with genuine hollandaise. Sandwiches run to hearty American classics (including some veg choices), and along with beef burgers, turkey burgers, and veggie burgers, there are no fewer than six twists on lean charbroiled chicken breast on a burger bun. The sheltered patio is always crowded, but there's a large interior dining room with a separate smoothies-and-ice-cream bar. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. - N.W. (10/01)

Vivace Four Seasons Resort Aviara, 7100 Four Seasons Point, Carlsbad, 760-603-3773. If you ever wished to eat like the Medicis did, here's the place for it. This lovely hotel-restaurant at a gorgeous resort showcases Italian haute cuiine which is simpler and more natural than the French equivalent. You'll find inventive combinations of first-class in-gredients, skillfully executed and beautifully presented with none of the culinary clichés of the "mamma mia" joints. Reservations urged. Valet parking free for din-ers. "Casual-elegant" — no hats, shorts, or tennies - but room may be painfully noisy if patrons get too festive. Dinner seven nights. Four-course tasting dinner a relative bargain, but wine list may blow the budget. Moderate (pastas and risot-tos) to very expensive. -N.W. (8/03)

Asia Vous 417 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-747-5000. Chef-owner Riko Bartolomei produces outstandingly inventive Asian-French fusion cuisine, remaking the classics with fresh twists and superb ingredients, including naturally raised meats and poultry. No one does "fusion" better, and there's not a culinary cliché on the menu: e.g., every-body else's warm goat cheese with beet salad is replaced with goat cheese tem-pura and braised fennel. The inspired combinations include sweetbreads with Chinese sausage, potato gnocchi with lobster and vanilla bean sauce, housecured hamachi atop a flower-like heir-loom tomato mandala, and a Kurobata pork shank treated like French "confit" but lightened by a sprightly salad ac-companiment. Bartolomei's desserts are not only housemade but as brilliant as the earlier courses. The international wine list is adventurous - all this, plus the unpretentious atmosphere and considerate service, too. (But the place can get noisy when full.) Reservations urged, even for lunch. Parties of more than six accommodated only with set menus. Two vegetarian entrées (including one vegan) on the typical menu. Lunch Tuesday through Friday; dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Casa Reveles Mexican and Seafood Restaurant Harvest Farms Village, 29000 Lilac Road, Val-

ley Center, 760-749-8041. (Also at 201 Mission Avenue, Escondido, 760-480-5565, with a Mexican-Italian menu.) "Revels," as the locals pronounce it, is probably the best restau-rant in Valley Center proper, offering zesty, careful cooking with some un-usually authentic flavors. The Michoacán-style carnitas (available in sev-eral "stuffed" dishes as well as an entrée) are outstanding for their moist smokiness, and the house's slightly crunchy fresh-tomatillo version of salsa verde is exciting. Seafood is necessarily frozen (given the inland location), but is handled tenderly. In fact, everything's a good deal better than it has to be, given the lack of neighborhood competition. Definitely worth a stop-off when heading to or from the nearby casinos. Late breakfast through dinner daily. Breakfast specials Saturday and Sunday until noon. Family atmosphere, but watch out for karaoke nights (Wednesday and Saturday). Full bar (cantina attached). Inexpensive to low moderate, with some three-course seafood dinners high moderate. – N.W. The best attraction is the long, adventurous wine list, offering international bottles at bargain prices with by-the-glass choices galore. Half the fun is matching wines to foods. The beer list is sophisticated, too, as are well-priced cognacs and aged ports. Business-casual dress code. Kids allowed in casino restaurants, not in gambling area. Azul La Jolla 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-9616. The unobstructed ocean view and opulent interior are glamorous. Cuisine is Mediterranean with California influence. Menus change daily. When available, try pan-seared scallops and the outstanding asparagus soup, not duplicated anywhere. Fresh fish and seafood. Moderate to expensive. -E.W. (7/99)

Come On In! 1030-B Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-551-1063. (Also at 10184 Telesis Court, Sorrento Valley, 858-558-8964; and 11455 El Camino Real, Carmel Valley, 858-350-2700.) Clunky name, but suave Euro-bistro feel with outside tables under trees. This is your escape to "Paree" anytime you can afford La Jolla. Actually, they keep the price of breakfasts — like two "plain and simple" steamed eggs with fresh fruit and toast, or the "Popeye" omelet, with spinach, Parmesan cheese, prosciutto ham, and diced tomato, fruit, and toast — down to a small roar. Of course, everybody in this neck of the woods is trying *not* to eat, so expect lots of fruit plates and healthy lunch sandwiches like roasted eggplant with zucchini, bell peppers, tomatoes, and mozzarella. Open daily, weekends to 8 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate; dinners a little more expensive. — *E.B. (4/03)*

Donovan's Steak and Chop House 4340 La Jolla Village Drive, Golden Triangle, 858-450-6666. At this excellent traditional steakhouse, the menu includes a variety of appetizers, among them a cocktail of giant shrimp with a spicy, tomatoey sauce and a large, lightly sauctéed crab cake with housemade tartar sauce. The wet-aged prime beefsteaks are seasoned with sea salt and pepper and cooked on a gas grill precisely to your order. Bleu cheese, bear naise, and peppercorn sauces are avail able at extra charge. Non-beef entrées include fish, seafood, veal chop, pork chop, or a delicate Australian rack of lamb. Unlike many steakhouses where your money buys only the meat, entrées are served with vegetables and potato. Additional à la carte sides include creamed spinach and sautéed mushrooms. Among the house-made desserts the highlights are a light, creamy cheese cake with fresh strawberry sauce and a traditional creme brûlée. The service is attentive, friendly, and knowledgeable, in a masculine setting with dark wood-paneling, dim lighting, and only a moderate noise level. Cigar room off the bar. Among the special joys here are a sophisticated foie gras tor*chon*, luscious free-range veal, and top-quality seafood, with garnishes that display an impressive balance of venturesome creativity and rigorous technique. And you don't even have to dress to the nines for your first-class dinner — the sixes will do in the easy bistro atmosphere. Serving lunch (including a moderate two-course prix fixe) and dinner daily, including bargainpriced three-course prix fixe "sunset din-ners." Cooked fish entrées feature equally sparkling seafood, sometimes in almost goofily elaborate preparations. No reservations; 30-minute wait likely on weekends. Sushi bar is up a short staircase; dining room and patio tables are wheelchair accessible. Several vegetarian choices. Full bar, good sake list. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. *— N.W. MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Bale French Sandwich Shop 4879 University Avenue (at 49th Street), City Heights, 619-283-4352. Ann Nguyen started this back in 1980, and her prices haven't changed — they're incredibly low. But the taste of her sandwiches is up there in French-Vietnamese heaven. The Vietnamese are special at this: they do French better than the French - with some spicy Asian touches. The BBQ Pork French sandwich delivers the immediate taste of cilantro, garlicky mayonnaise, sweet barbecue sauce, carrots onions, cucumber, and lashings of sliced pork, with the occasional heat of a green jalapeño. But above all, it's that crunch of bread — fresh, feathery, and very French — that makes this hard to beat. Add dessert of homemade banana shrimp cake and — *voila!* Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/02)

China Max 4698 Convoy Street (at Engineer), Kearny Mesa, 858-650-3333. The decor is plain and bright, the sound level loud, but this is a major resource for authentic Hong Kong cooking - creative and multiregional, filtered through the refined wizardry of the genuine Cantonese style. The seafood aswim in the live tanks includes such delicacies as black cod (bony but wonderfully sweet), Dungeness crab, and (if you've got the money) abalone - but even inexpensive, homey dishes (e.g., wonton soup crabmeat cakes) sing with flavor. Call ahead for reservations to avoid a wait at the door. A Pan-Asian community throngs here, for good reason. Lunch weekdays, dinner seven days. Inexpensive to exorbitant but mainly moderate. -N.W. IKEA Restaurant & Cafe 2149 Fenton Parkway, Mission Valley, 619-283-6166, ext.1200. Central shrine for San Diego's 10,000 Swedes, so they say. They come to taste open-faced sandwiches, salmon, shrimp, and meatballs again. This restaurant inside Sweden's wildly successful "home interiors" chain is a great intro to Swedish tastes. The food's more sensible than exciting, of course. But healthy — beef and pork for the meatballs are guaranteed hormone free. You eat the meatballs with Swedish lingonberry (not cranberry) sauce. Seafood is big: the shrimp open-faced sandwich, the salmon plate with potatoes and broccoli, and the Gravad Lox Plate (cured salmon) are always on. And if you want to be disgustingly healthy, chew on their fresh vegetable plate (raw carrot sticks, cauliflower, garbanzo beans, and mushrooms). All for a song. The only health hazard: hordes of babies and kids romping in the restaurant's motherfriendly play area. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (5/02)*

Seoul B.B.Q. 4344 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-505-8700. This Korean restaurant means sitting before a sizzling cast-iron grill, sipping hot sake, the smell of grilled beef, grilled onions, and fresh garlic in the air. Try the "Korean B.B.Q." marinated short ribs (*tong galbi*) or thick marbled slices of sirloin (beef *gui*). You'll enjoy all the accompanying dishes that make the meal, like crunchy seaweed salads, radishes in garlicky tomato sauce, slow-cooked potatoes with soy sauce and jalapeño pepper. Feeling adventurous? Go for the goat meat hot pot or Korean steak tartare (*yukhwoe*). This is sensual, elemental, hairy-chested food. The Australian Pub 1014 Grand Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-273-9921. A great place to take your kids after a morning at the beach. This relaxing pub, owned by a true-blue Aussie, offers heaps of good Aussie food. Try the Road Kill (grilled chicken breast with pico de gallo sauce and cheese "run over" between 2 pieces of sourdough) or the Aussie Burger (1/2-pound patty, with a fried egg, cheese, bacon, grilled onions, beets, pineapple, and a side of steak fries). And for an "outback experience," order up Vegemite (a beefy kinda paste) and four slices of bread — it's the Aussie national food, mate. Open Monday through Thursday 11 a.m. to 1 a.m.; Friday 11 a.m. to 2 a.m.; weekends 8 a.m. to 2 a.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (10/01)*

Broken Yolk Cafe 1851 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-270-YOLK (9655). Breakfasting PBers love this place for three reasons: its sundeck, its 26 different four-egg omelets (which you can split with your partner, no extra charge), and the challenge of omelet #27. The dozen-egg "Broken Yolk Café Special" comes stuffed with a mountain of mushrooms, onion, cheese, chili, plus home fries and biscuits. If you can down it in an hour, pay just \$1.98 — you've got huevos. If you can't, the yolk's on you—pay around \$17. My advice: split a 4-egger. Open 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B. Hancock St. Cafe 3354 Hancock Street, Loma Portal, 619-296-2060. If you spot Marilyn, Elvis, and Lady Liberty waving at you from the sidewalk, you're here. They are life-size fiberglass lookalikes, but Mario is real, and his restaurant is a living shrine to jazz pianist Herbie Hancock. Mario has pianos, guitars, and drums inside — even a little stage where you're often welcome to perform. The food? Italian home cooking. Mario is from New York and knows his pasta. You can usually expect a good-value spe-cial, like spaghetti and meatballs. Sometimes he'll even throw in a bottle of red wine. Here among the little factories and auto shops of Loma Portal may be San Diego's most popping cultural phenomenon. Worth investigating, even if you just want to eat. The huge array of desserts is house made, too, with something for every palate. The most desirable tables (available first come, first served) are on a lovely fireplace-heated patio. Wheelchair ramp and parking in small lot behind restaurant (call ahead and they'll save you a spot). Homey atmosphere; can gel loud. Affordable wine list, full bar. Open daily, dinner only. Saska's 3768 Mission Boulevard, Mission Beach, 858-488-7311. Venerable, local steak-and-seafood joint that tries harder, from the broth-thin homemade teriyaki sauce (sweet up front, fading to bitter ginger) for the well-cooked (if mild-flavored) fish to the cut-on-thepremises aged beef. The interior's low wood-slat ceilings, driftwood beams, dim light, and red-leather booths combine with the stay-up-late kitchen to make the space feel like a cozy haven, a respite from the brighter buzz of Mission Beach. The wine list runs the gamut from Cook's sparkling wine to Cristal champagne, stopping along the way at an interesting (if expensive) collection of reserves. Next door is the restaurant's serviceable sushi bar (858-488-7255) and two-story patio dining. Lunch weekdays, brunch and lunch weekends; dinner seven days. Sushi bar open nightly, 5:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. Moderate. — A.M. (8/02)

The Third Corner Wine Shop and **Bistro** 2265 Bacon Street, Ocean Beach, 619-223-2700. Ed Moore's casual, loosey-goosey spot is first of all a wine shop selling most global bottlings for just 20% over wholesale. It's \$5 to pop the cork there if you plunk down at a table among the racks to enjoy casual bistro-style food designed to go with wine. You can snack on goat cheese salad, smoked duck salad, a cheese plate or a pâté plate, or get serious with braised short ribs or duck confit surprisingly paired with spicy Nawlins red beans and rice. No reservations accepted, so best to go at off-hours or you'll wait for a table. Comfortable lounge with fireplace for sipping. Full bar. No corkage charge after 11 p.m., when restaurant staffers drop in for after-work noshing. Lunch and ed Monday. dinner until 1 a.m.; close Low-moderate. - N.W. (12/05)

Umi Sushi 2806 Shelter Island Drive (at Shafter, off Scott), Point Loma, 619-226-1135. An instant neighborhood success, this large, cheerful sushi bar and dinner house also offers Japanese and Korean entrées, including *teppanyaki* (cooked in the kitchen, not at the table), Korean ribs, and excellent beef teriyaki of gently grilled prime beef. Sushi highlights include lemony *ama ebi*, rich garlic tuna, and a "Crazy Boy" roll spicy enough to divert your palate from the presence of imitation crabmeat. Free parking lot (often full). Special kids' menu available. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner daily. Sushi prices lower than most; entrées inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

This wine bar-bistro of-fers "Italian tapas" of simple Italian classics lightened up and scaled down to medium-size portions — about the size you probably eat at home. All the condiments are on the table, so you can season or cheese your food to taste as you go instead of having a waiter waft them before you've lifted a fork. Good dishes include prosciutto-wrapped shrimp, eggplant rollatini, and for dessert, an airy lemon cheesecake mousse. Parking via alley 1/2-block west. No reservations, but for weeknight large groups, call ahead. Weekends, arrive very early or late or expect a wait. Call-in/take-out food orders okay. Check chalkboard on sidewalk for specials. Plenty for vegetarians and vegans, Sound level: roaring, Dinner Tues day through Sunday (weekends until 11 p.m.). Inexpensive. - N.W. (7/05)

Big Kitchen 3003 Grape Street (between 30th Street and Fern Street), South Park, 619-234-5789. This isn't just a restaurant, it's the social center of the universe — and Judy "The Beauty" Forman is its queen. Blame her for the Fern Street Circus, for driving the Miss California beauty pageant out of town, and for disgustingly healthy dishes like Judy's Favorite (spinach, mushrooms, sherry, and eggs). Our favorite: the avocado, cream cheese, and chives omelet. Vegans' fave may be the "veggie option": sautéed spinach, mushrooms, onions, cilantro, brown rice, tofu, and roasted garlic. Her cooks make pretty much everything on the spot, including muffins, waffles, and pancakes. While you're waiting, they always have this "out there" eclectic crowd, plus walls filled with pictures and *bon* nots like "Will Be President For Food " Breakfast and lunch only; closes at 2 p.m. most days. Inexpensive. - E.B. (10/02)

Chicken Pie Shop of San Diego 2633 El Cajon Boulevard, North Park 619-295-0156. How much do people love this place? Count the chickens lining the walls — ceramic, wood, beaded, painted, even feathered. Hundreds. They're gifts from generations of customers. Now, as in the 1930s when it started up, the basic chicken pie comes filled with big chunks of chicken meat, doused with white gravy and accompanied by mashed potatoes, veggies, coleslaw, a roll, and dessert — like the delicious pineapple pie available Mondays - all for one really low price. The menu also offers fried chicken, burgers and steaks, but 90 percent of customers still order that same old chicken pie. Seven days. Cash only. Inexpensive. E.B. (11/01)

Huffman's Bar-B-Que 5039 Imperial Avenue (at Euclid), Chollas View, 619-264-3115. This café has a huge multigenerational following, some famous — check out their wall photos, in which Jesse Jackson and Muhammad Ali are just two — and some not so famous.

Try their gravy-smothered fried chicken served with collard greens, yellow peppers, red beans, rice, and white mopping-up bread, or their Louisiana Creole gumbo, thick with crab, shrimp, links, ham, and chicken. Other fine eats include the catfish sandwich and half-pound rib tips. Open daily, lunch and dinner, to 11 p.m. weekdays, 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. - E.B. (11/00)

Krakatoa 1128 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-230-0272. This used to be an abandoned property. Now the swamp-green clapboard house is the coolest, if (reportedly) ghost-ridden, coffee-eatery hang-outery in Golden Hill. Its garden is lush and tropical, and on its wooden deck laptops unfold, essays get written, relationships get worked out. The menu is light, the names heavy: the breakfast sandwich (scrambled eggs cheese, fruit) is the Wonchi (an Ethiopian caldera); the roast turkey sandwich with ham, cream cheese, and cranberry sauce is the Ubehebe (a dormant volcano in Death Valley); the Amboy (a Mojave Desert volcano) is a peanut butter, honey, banana, cinnamon, and bacon sandwich. Open 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. (Sundays till 6 p.m.). Inexpensive. - E.B. (12/05)

La Dona 1784 Newton (at Beardslev), Barrio Logan, 619-233-4939, This café is steeped in Mexican history, es pecially Barrio Logan history. You half expect to see several L.A. Zoot-suitors drift in as you inspect the black-andwhite shots of the late actress Maria Fe

lix (Mexico's Marilyn Monroe) or the great photos of the Mexican Revolution that include Zapata and Pancho Villa. The place has been here for 63 years, and old-timers say it reminds them of long-ago cafés in Los Angeles, Modesto, or Madera. The food is home cooking, Mexican style, with meals like scrambled eggs and chorizo with rice and refried beans. Watch out for the pot o' salsa — it's a real jaw-slammer. Other dishes to sample include chicharrones, menudo, and pozole. Seven days. breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. -E.B. (10/05)

The Linkery 3386 30th Street (at Upas), North Park, 619-255-8778. The artisanal "slow food" cuisine here features local ingredients and made-fromscratch preparations. Despite the name there's a full menu that includes tasty grilled vegetable appetizers and some fine entrées. But the focus is on the side dishes of fresh sausages made daily onpremises. These vary not only in composition but in palatability. Good ones include chicken curry, linguisa, Polynesian pork. Venturesome interna-tional wine list at low markups, plus international beers and Mexican Coca-Cola (better tasting than U.S. made). Small parking lot (enter by alley on Upas just east of Jack in the Box). Noisy even when nearly empty. No reserva-tions. Lunch and dinner daily, until 11 p.m. Moderate. — N.W. (7/05)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Antonio's Hacienda 700 North Johnson Avenue, El Cajon, 619-442-9827. If the decor hasn't been updated from its original 1960s-fabu

lous Old California Spanish, it's because there's been no need. The enormous dark-wood chandeliers, the padded-leather wooden chairs, the chainsaw-weathered wood beams all top-shelf and aging well. Families abound, reveling in the guitar trio and the exposed kitchen station — such atmosphere! And the flavors are user-friendly, sweetness muting the spice in the salsa and the Ranchero sauce. The Camarones Tequila is a little more exciting: the sweetness of its baconwrapped shrimp gets a fine counter from the bitter liqueur in the marinade. Excellent Enchiladas Suizas: pale, mush-tender shredded chicken wrapped in tortillas and doused with good, tangy green sauce. Lunch and dinner daily. Champagne brunch on Sunday, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; all-day buffet Sunday. Inexpensive to low moderate. -A.M. (4/03)

Geno's West Coast Style Barbecue 291 West Main Street, El Cajon, 619-444-3667. Geno's a real guy, a refugee from corporate America who turned this ex-Taco Bell joint into a surfing-themed BBQ place. He's a surfer but he's serious. He has won lots of prizes for his BBQ sauce, using a chili pepper he says nobody else has. There are three strengths: "Round-up" (mild), "Giddy-up" (spicy), or "Stam-pede" (hot). Try #5, pulled pork and slaw, or #9, shredded beef, melted jack, and sautéed onions. Sides like dirty rice and cornbread are good, but if you're light of pocket go for the "Ripcurl" hot dog, the best deal on the menu. Open 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (1/04)

Johnny B's 4738 Fourth Street (at La Mesa Boulevard), La Mesa, 619-464-2465. This "Burgers and Brew" bar is a real 1950s place with

burgers to die for and good bar snacks, including a zesty jalapeño dip. Play pool, watch TV, hide from your ex on the smoker's patio out back. On Sundays (1 p.m. to 7 p.m. only), their ten-ounce New York steak, fries, beans, and salad is a must-eat at a rock-bottom price. Open daily, lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday, three meals Sunday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (9/05)

Sala Thai 6161 El Caion Boulevard (College Plaza), College Area, 619-229-9050. With purple cloth napkins, white tablecloths, green banquettes, butter-colored walls, and a portrait of King Chulalongkorn, Sala Thai has all the trappings of a class joint — except you're only paying six or eight bucks for main dishes. The food? A bit gentle on the spice front. Tom yum kung, the famous shrimp soup, should make your neck hairs stick straight out, but if that's what you want you'll have to ask the cooks to make it spicier. Chicken *mussaman*, labeled "medium spicy," is pretty tame but still delicious with its authentic taste-boosters like kaffir lime leaves. Hottest curry: "chicken green." Health treat: Som tum, the famous papaya salad. Lunch, dinner daily; dinner only on Sunday. Inexpensive. - E.B. (4/04)

Toshi Sushi 5943 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-287-3536. Don't ask what's in the "dynamite" sauce (besides the obvious mayo and smelt roe) — it's a house secret, one the restaurant dangles before you in numerous contexts. Try it baked onto the rich, everything-goes Garbage Roll, where deep-fried shrimp, freshwater eel, and tuna add flavor to the creamycrunchy interplay of sauce and vegetables. Rolls, both plain and elaborate, abound here. While some can be heavy on the rice and light on the fish, others are triumphs. The Toshi Tempura Special Roll takes battered whitefish and wraps it around the seaweed casing, which is then filled with just-cooked whitefish and a host of garnishes - an exotic-yet-homey fried-fish alternative. The Johnny Roll shows octopus at its most tender, but watch out for spot-light-hogging sweet cream cheese. The simpler sushi can vary — a brilliant, translucent slice of tuna offset by a blander, duller salmon. Japanese entrées are also available. Inexpensive to moderate. -A.M. (4/02)

Valley House Restaurant 10767 Woodside Avenue (at Magnolia), Santee, 619-562-7878. This is for Cornbelt folks, plus wannabes who enjoy plainspeaking, plenty-of-it Iowan food. Take the morning special, "Iowa Breakfast" breaded pork tenderloin, two eggs, and hash browns, fries, or grits, plus a choice of biscuits, muffins, or toast it's delicious. Lunch or dinnertime vou can't go wrong ordering the signature "Iowa Porker" hot sandwich (breaded pork tenderloin in a bun with soup, potato salad, or steak fries) or the "Iowa Beefers" (seasoned ground beef sim-mered in chicken broth, piled into a burger bun). Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (8/01)

FAR EAST

Bernard's The Mall (way in back), 503 Palm Canyon Drive, Borrego Springs, 760-767-5666. Owner Bernard Hess must be from Alsace, on the French-German border - who else would offer both frog's legs in garlic sauce and a tasty, credible choucroute garni (sauerkraut and smoked meat casserole, including house-smoked pork chops)? At this local favorite, the space divided between a convivial bar

and a dining room with lunch-counter and booth seating, the menu includes German, French, and truck-stop U.S. classics — *schnitzel* side by side with chicken-fried steak. The waitresses know most patrons by name, and the patrons walk in already knowing what they're going to order — mainly the Alsatian specialties. Wine list runs to third-rate Californian, but there's an affordable chardonnay (and beer works with this food, too). Closed Sunday. Inexpensive to low moderate. N.W. (4/03)

Mediterraneo 1347 Tayern Road (Alpine Creek Shopping Center), Alpine, 619-445-9902. The vibe in this tasteful little trattoria (with adjoining bar) is young, and so is the chef, still slipping new dishes into a menu stuffed with local favorites. The pizzas are outstanding — such a lovely, airy, silken crust! Such wafer-thin rounds of pepperoni! Entrées change with the sea-sons. Desserts are big and sweet. When the weather's fine, dine on the patio and watch the sun drape light over the piney hills. Daily, lunch and dinner, plus Sunday brunch. Expensive. — A.M. (12/03)

Paipa's Oasis Sycuan Casino, 5469 Casino Way, Dehesa, 619-445-6002. Forget gambling — gambol through the slots till you pass under two huge ele-phant tusks. The "Joe and the Volcano"style place with a fountain tower gur-gling in the center is Paipa's. Pay the woman. Now decide: a lot of a little, or a little of a lot. The huge salad bar is surrounded by a groaning U-shaped table laden with everything from peel-andeat shrimp to baked cod to Certified Black Angus prime rib. Keep coming back. Save them from throwing away this stuff. End with, say, strawberry cheesecake and coffee. Unlike the other

Bertrand Hug's airy, open renovation of this formerly "an cient regime" eatery offers a fabled panoramic city view with a casual-chic highly romantic ambience. Chef Stephane Voitzwinkler's modern French cuisine is a fine fit for the setting, including bistro classics and fresh inventions, emphasizing top-grade seasonal ingredients. A huge, intelligent wine list covers a full range of prices, ages and ori-gins, including "ripe" first-growth Bordeaux. Smoking and fair-weather din-ing on wraparound terrace/observation deck. Note: parking entrance on Fourth Avenue; wheelchair access via ramp to left of reception desk. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Expensive. N.W. (2/04)

Blue Water Seafood Market and Grill 3667 India Street (at Chalmers). midtown, 619-497-0914. This bright clean charmer a half-block south of El Indio has a double identity: First, it's a retail fish market; aside from Whole Foods this is the only restaurant-quality fresh raw seafood south of I-8 and west of City Heights. If you love oysters, don't miss the big, buttery bivalves here. Second, it serves simple, terrific seafood to eat in or out. Plates are plastic, but don't look for greasy fried stuff. Entrées are grilled gently until perfectly done, topped with your pick of flavors (the lemon-garlic butter is especially tasty) and come with rice and a huge salad with your choice of terrific house-made dressings. If indecisive ask what's best that day. The overstuffed grilled fish tacos are messy and perfect, with just the right proportions of ingre-dients. Reachable only by driving north on India. Metered street parking by day. Good choice of beers; a few affordable wines; \$5 corkage for BYOW. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to low moderate. - N.W. (4/05)

Bombay Exotic Cuisine Of India 3975 Fifth Avenue (between University and Washington), Hillcrest, 619-298-3155. We're talking northern India here, right? That means lots of lamb, potatoes, creamy sauces, tandoor baked breads, chicken, and less of the south's mouth-scalding heat. At least in its daily buffet, Bombay's a lot less spicy, (though their *sag paneer* — creamy, cheesy spinach — delivered a surprising punch). The buffet includes tandoori chicken, assorted *pakoras* (lentil-batter fritters), mock duck, chicken *tikka*, and, if you hit the right day, an addictive mango soup. If you want meat or spicy food, best to order from the menu say, a creamy tikka masala with lamb, or long kebabs of minced lamb (kebab curry), or the rich Bombay Coconut Malai. Tell them whether you want it mild, spicy or, for leather-mouths, tikhi For a cheap, light meal, try a couple of lamb samosas. And be sure they bring the chutneys, India's real unexplored treasure. Lunch and dinner; buffet at lunch and Monday evenings only. Sister restaurant, Monsoon, 729 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-234-5555. Moderate. — E.B. (4/03)

El Agave 2304 San Diego Avenue (at Old Town Avenue), Old Town, 619-220-0692 Reservations recom mended. Wheelchair access difficult (steep ramp). You'll find upscale, un-usual Mexican specialties in an intimate Spanish-style dining room or on a small heated balcony. The menu celebrates three great pre-Hispanic cuisines — Aztec, Mayan, Nahuatl — with discreet admixtures of France, Spain, and Italy. (It's the history of Mexico on a plate.) Among the highlights are the five different Oaxacan moles (plus a sixth from Chiapas), local sea bass in tangy jamaica (hibiscus) sauce, and a unique appetizer, tlacogos cuitlacoche, ovals of blue corn masa topped with a sort of "mushroom" that grows on corn ears. (In English it's called "corn smut," but it tastes much nicer than that sounds.) The bar stocks at least 1700 tequilas and makes a foodfriendly on-the-rocks margarita with fresh fruit juices. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. - N.W. (2/01)

El Indio Mexican Restaurant 3695 India Street, midtown, 619-299-0333. El Indio, "the god of Mexican food," pre-

sides over this bustling (expect a line), airy restaurant in an atmosphere of pale blue 1940s solidity. The menu includes the usual suspects (burritos, tacos, etc.), plus slightly less common items (machaca, chile rellenos). Excellent house-made corn tortillas help the standard fare to better approximate the divine. So do the sublime core flavors of the meats — the chicken in the taco and the beef in the enchiladas. The carne asada sports a pleasant char, and the beans have a raw-beany intensity. Less heavenly: seasonings (especially paprika and salt) tend toward the heavy side. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive. -A.M. (11/01)

El Zarape 4642 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-692-1652. This stylish little Mexican restaurant on a tony stretch of Park Boulevard is proof that not all taco shop food is equal. Try a shredded beef or chicken taco or tostada and you'll know what we mean, with their generous mounds of juicy, slowcooked meat. Many enjoy their unusual scallop burritos, vegetarian potato-filled burritos and rolled tacos, and well-pre-pared soups. We go for the stewed meat. El Zarape is dependable, serving Mexi-can with solid, homemade, handmade flavor. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. -M.N. (1/00)

Islander Grill Embassy Hotel, 3645 Park Boulevard (at Cypress), 619-297-3929. Here's a chance to sample the unique tropical cuisine of Guam, an island at the crossroads of the South Pacific. The cooking includes traces of Mexico, the Philippines, Japan, and Hawaii — all filtered through the spicy Chamorro palate. Try the chicken ke-laguen, a citric salad resembling ceviche, or the brilliant coconut shrimp (avail-able as a starter or entrée). Stews are flavorful: The saucy "pot roast" is defi-nitely not your mother's, unless Mom's from Guam, and the chicken stews are equally savory. Other choices include a range of salty, teriyaki-style barbecued meats, barbecued chicken in a less salty marinade, plus numerous exotic appe tizers. Free parking in small hotel lot. Everything available for take out. No alcohol. Lunch through dinner daily, early dinner Sundays. Very inexpensive. – Ń.W. (3/05)

Jimmy Carter's Cafe 3172 Fifth Avenue (at Spruce Street), Hillcrest, 619-295-2070. This comfy, middleclass eatery has a surprise — great In-dian breakfasts (until 11:20 a.m. weekdays, 3 p.m. weekends). Try their chicken curry or *pessaratu* (mung bean crêpe with onions, peppers, ginger, *dhal*, and chutneys). Or vegetarian *vindaloo.* Jimmy (no, not the ex-pres) does Chinese too — like the Mongolian beef (Chinese vegetables and beef in a hot chili sauce over rice or noodles), or good Mexican dishes such as chili verde (pork or chicken simmered in spicy tomatillo sauce). But center stage is his all-American Jimmy Burger (1/3pound patty with potato or carrot salad). One bonus: a fine tangential view of Balboa Park's lawns and trees. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/01)

Laurel Restaurant 505 Laurel Street (at Fifth), uptown, 619-239-2222. Freshly remodeled and remade by Tracey Borkum, the owner of Chive and Kensington Grill, the restaurant looks like a million bucks (the price she bought it for). In a chic, creamy dining room below street level vou'll enjoy modern eclectic cuisine with French and Mediterranean flavors showcasing premium in-season ingredients, in-cluding free-range chicken. No bread unless you pay for it, but you get

edamame to nibble while awaiting your order. The global wine list is extensive and expensive; selected bottles are halfprice on Sundays. The full bar features creative cocktails and 20 sakes. Valet parking \$6. Several steps down from street level; disabled access via carport on Fifth Avenue (phone before coming to ensure that entry is open). Open for dinner nightly. Expensive, but an earlybird three-course chef menu is moderate. -N.W. (3/06)

Parallel 33 741 W. Washington Street (at Hawk), Mission Hills, 619-260-0033. Southern China, Pakistan, Algeria, Morocco, et cetera — are all on the 33rd parallel. This ethnoblend restaurant in Mission Hills is a hit for shrewd, thoughtful creativity. It's not just "fusion food." Try the superb mango and ahi appetizer. Entrées show that chef Amiko Gubbins, of Café Japengo fame, knows what she's doing. Dinner Monday through Saturday. Moderate to expensive. — *M.N. (10/99)*

Shakespeare Pub & Grille 3701 India Street (at Washington), South Mission Hills, 619-299-0230. Probably the most convincing English pub in town. The Bard's brew-house boasts bare-board floors, diamond lead-glass windows, and authentic Brits sitting around the bar quaffing ale from their own pewter mugs. Pub grub is bluff and plain-spoken. Shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, ploughman's plate (the pickled onions and cheese, Scotch egg, and Branston pickle make it the real thing) — all are great with rich English beer, say, a Boddington's Pub Ale. Sunday's roast beef dinner is worth dragging yourself out of bed for, too. The pub includes a shop that sells British goods. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B. (9/01)





Blue Point 565 Fifth Avenue (at Market), Gaslamp, 619-233-6623. In a handsome, plushy dining room, pristine seafood and Prime-grade steaks and chops are featured in well-focused preparations highlighting Pacific Rim and Mediterranean flavors. A fine lobster bisque includes plenty of lobster, and crab-stuffed trout and dayboat scallops are among the highlights of the menu. But at this conventioneers' favorite, be sure to specify the doneness you prefer, especially for fish, which defaults to welldone. Valet parking onsite, or inexpensive self-parking one block east at Park It On Market. Large sidewalk dining patio. Business-casual dress looks best here. Reservations urged. Dinner nightly. — *N.W. (9/05)*

Brickyard Coffee and Tea 675 West G Street, downtown, 619-696-7220. The problem, if you're rich enough to live in the Marina District, is the lack of café life. That is, until this modest little eatery and café settled in next to the tracks by the Seaport Village trolley stop. You sit under eleven poplar trees in a brick patio that has one unusual downtown advantage — except for the wind sifting through the poplars (or a trolley pulling in), it's completely silent here. Sipping coffee and reading your paper is the thing here, but you can fill up, too, with items like "Texas chili," or grilled cheese and tomato sandwich with a cup of chili, or spinach and mushroom quiche with a small Caesar salad, or *panini*. You can also order half a sandwich — turkey, ham, beef, or tuna — with a cup of soup or Caesar salad. It's the nearest thing to a French country café. Open early morning till 2 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (12/04)

Cafe Cerise 1125 Sixth Avenue (at C Street), downtown, 619-595-0153. The name is French for "cherry," and although the café's logo looks more like a cherry bomb, this craftsmanly kitchen is no dud. Chef-owner Jason Seibert seems blessed with an instinct for deciding what goes with what, and in what proportions. His daily-changing Euro-Cal bistro menu emphasizes fresh, in-season produce and plenty of slow-cooked comfort foods, prepared honestly from scratch. Don't miss the day's choice of house-made pâtés or sausages, the herb-stuffed organic chicken, or the fish *en* papillotte. There's an adventurous, affordable wine list and a full bar. The modest bill for such an indulgent feast is the cherry on top. Lunch weekdays; dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W. (5/04)

Cafe Chloe 721 Ninth Avenue (at G Street), East Village, 619-232-3242. How did we ever manage before this indispensable bistro opened? In a bright and beautiful setting with small tables, barseating, and a patio, you'll find light and lovely Parisian-style bistro fare with substantial breakfasts, svelte lunches and dinners, and sophisticated bar-nibbles. Don't miss breakfast's poached eggs with sage-truffle *beure blanc*. Nightly specials keep the menu interesting, and desserts are worth every calorie. Beverages in-

clude divine lavender lemonade, specialty root beer, and an intelligent wine list at modest markups, everything available by the glass. Metered street-parking daytime. No reservations except large groups. Moderate. — N.W. (7/05)

Chive 558 Fourth Avenue (near Island), Gaslamp, 619-232-4483. Here you'll find a new cuisine for the upscale residential neighborhood rising around the restaurant. Diners can choose an adventurous meal or an evening of sophisticated comfort food. Urbane multicultural fusion dishes dance cheek to cheek with remade American classics and the occasional sleek French luxury dish. A "grazing menu" features small bites for folks on a diet or on the run. The menu changes seasonally, but you can trust the kitchen any time of year. Very noisy. Full bar. Dinner nightly, until 11:30 p.m. weekends. Full meals expensive; "grazing" can be moderate. — N.W. (3/06)

Dobson's 956 Broadway Circle, downtown, 619-231-6771. This reputable downtown restaurant offers class and comfort, geared for people who enjoy eating well. The food is good, often very good, as with chicken liver mousse pâté, Mediterranean blue mussels, and, when available, the crude but virtuous softshell crab. Their sweets, such as brownies, are hefty, louche, and cheap. Bring a date to the upstairs dining room. Dobson's is suave, its confidence infectious. Lunch and dinner Monday through Friday; dinner only on Saturday. Moderate to expensive. — *M.N. (10/98)*

Fleming's Steak House & Wine Bar 380 K Street (at Fourth), Gaslamp, 619-237-1155. Original branch at 8970 University Center Lane, University City/Golden Triangle, 858-535-0078. A steakhouse for ladies who power lunch, an "old girls" club, or just a happy place where the term "a nice piece of meat" isn't a bad thing? The mahogany of the "old boys" steakhouse genre gives way here to cheery cherry wood. When you get the fried cheese, it's Brie, rolled in panko bread crumbs and slivered almonds. And the wine list boasts far more than just burly Cabernets and Bordeaux — over 100 of the far-flung offerings are available by the glass and you can assemble your own three-glass tasting flights. Prime steaks are the main event, perfectly cooked and well-seasoned. Try the Key Lime pie for dessert—custardy and full of limey bite. Valet parking. Dinner nightly. Very expensive. — A.M. (3/04)

George's on Fifth 835 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-0444. This steak-house is in a historic building that was once a hangout of Wyatt Earp — it now boasts faux-Victorian decor and amusing wall art. Formerly Roger's on Fifth, it was owned by former mayor-felon Roger Hedgecock; now Roger's rabbited and left it to his partner George Harrington. It's still wildly popular with conventioneers on expense accounts. The menu offers Prime and ultra-Prime steaks, some of it at jaw-dropping prices — although entrées do include free vegetables. Ask for sauces on the side unless you like them thick and heavy. Some of the best items are non-beef: the cold seafood appetizers ("lobster martini," oysters, tuna tartare) and a juicy grilled pork chop. Good range of wines at normal to slightly high markups; full bar. Valet parking; cheaper lot through alley next to restaurant. Dinner nightly. Expensive to extreme. - N.W. (3/04)

Harbor House 831 West Harbor Drive, Seaport Village, downtown, 619-232-1141. This two-story Midwest-

erner-friendly eatery caters mainly to tourist families and conventioneers, but the upstairs Oyster Bar is a pretty spot to chill out and watch the sailboats over a good margarita and a plateful of iced bivalves. Upstairs preparations tend toward simple American coastal dishes; the menu includes more appetizers and the drinks include artisan beers. The down-stairs main dining room features more old-fashioned "haute" preparations and has a longer wine list but no view. All foods and drinks from both venues are available by request on both floors (but not all servers know this). Parking free with validation for two hours. Reservations strongly advised for after 6:15 p.m. any evening. Accessible via elevator from main dining room, with entrance on the park (south) side of the building. Lunch and dinner daily upstairs; dinner only downstairs. Moderate to expensive. — *N.W.* (8/05)

Indigo Grill 1536 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-6802. This second — and much grander — incarnation of chef Deborah Scott's Indigo Grill expands her original Native American motif, with its focus on root vegetables, game, and roasted spices. Now, the Pacific Coastal cuisine takes in more coast than most, drawing upon ingredients and techniques from Alaska to Oaxaca. (The decor, dark and urban-primitive, follows the theme.) Unexpected combinations are a mainstay; a single dish, such as the seafood *mixto*, may span the entire distance, bringing together a multitude of flavors that work together to create a wondrous whole. Fine breads are made in-house, as are desserts (try the decadent, crispy-creamy plantain cheesecake *flautas*). The wine list includes interesting varietals. Lunch weekdays, dinner mightly; closes early Sundays, but open

until 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Lunch: inexpensive to moderate; dinner moderate to expensive. — A.M. (11/02) La Casita 1247 C Street (at 13th Street), downtown, 619-531-0044. Don't be fooled by the li'l old blue-and-white clapboard house at the bottom of City College's hill. Princes and politicians come to this full-service restaurant to hammer out deals, mix with the Latino (or Anglo) community, and eat some of the best *chorizo con huevos* (spicy pork sausage with eggs) in town. Fair-weather eaters flock to the spacious garden patio to chow down among the songbirds. In the cozy Mexican-style interior, the pictures on the walls tell you who-all comes here for the good tacos and enchiladas or the delicious pork burritos. Most delicious of all is watching Anglo City-Hallers trying valiantly to learn to love the housemade menudo (tripe soup). Delivery anywhere downtown 8 a.m. to 2 p.m Open six days 6 a.m. to 3 p.m., closed Sundays. - E.B. (11/00)

Lou and Mickey's 224 Fifth Avenue (between K and L), Gaslamp, 619-237-4900. The onetime ornate Royale Brasserie across from the Convention Center finally had to bow to conventional tastes and simplify into a fifties-style steak-and-seafood house. Kings Seafood is still the owner, so the fish quality remains fine. The fare is simple, with minimal sauce or garnish; vegetables cost extra, coming in large portions but merely adequate preparations. Best dishes include "BBQ Shrimp, Manales' Style," a buttery, spicy New Orleans extravaganza (available as starter or entrée), and the huge, juicy rib-eye "Cowboy Steak." Valet parking at door. Wraparound heated dining patio. Noisy in dining room near bar; request "Nude Room" for quiet. For interesting wines

The old gal has come back to life as a lovely, fresh young thing, thanks to chef Brian Sinnott, arriving from San Francisco's top Italian restaurants. His seasonal cuisine offers clever, creative twists and superb local produce. Pick up a miniature menu at the dining room entrance to remind vourself of what you're eating - you'll appreciate all the more his astute combinations of unexpected ingredients. (Of course, some dishes are tried-and-trite clichés, however nicely prepared - conventioneers remember?) Try the stuffed squash blossoms, or diver scallops on celery root puree when available. The vegetarian tasting-platter is tempting even to hard-core "carnies." Vast choice of California wines including half-bottles and gener-ous pours by the glass, as well as a full bar. Reserve, even for two, or expect a wait. Free valet parking at hotel front door (Front Street entrance), validated for three hours. Open for dinner (call about Sunday or Monday). Napa Valley Grille 502 Horton Plaza, Gaslamp, 619-238-5440. This restaurant at the top of Horton Plaza is staffed by professionals and the food is very good, including the excellent grilled calamari. There is an elegant homeyness to Napa Valley Grille, a comforting, satisfying dining experience. Moderate to expensive. — M.N. (3/00)

Soleil @K Gaslamp Marriott, 660 K Street (at Sixth), Gaslamp, 619-446-6088. The fare here is simple California cuisine that won't scare the conventioneers, but the outdoor dining patio is a nice spot for a light meal. The spiffy, chrome-detailed interior, with an open kitchen, offers the option of eating with strangers at long tables or booking a large party of your own - but be prepared for noise (even when the room's empty, the music is pumped up partyloud). Starters include a zesty fried cala mari salad and crabby crab sticks, and desserts are witty as well as tasty. Entrées are unmemorable. Long international wine list with some "finds," full bar. Azzura Point Loews Coronado Bay Resort, 4000 Coronado Bay Road (Sil ver Strand Boulevard), Coronado, 619-424-4000 or 619-424-4477. The quietly luxurious dining room with a serene bayfront view is romantic and a bit dressy, but far from stuffy. It's not just for tourists, but a lovely evening's getaway for locals. The California French cuisine with an occasional Hawaiian touch emphasizes seasonal ingredients in slightly unexpected combinations. Along with a multi-course chef's tasting menu and à la carte dishes, a "sea spa" dinner showcases fresh seafoods in healthful preparations. A good wine list at reasonable markups is strong on half-bottles. Free valet parking at the porte cochere of the main lobby. Dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Very expensive. — N.W. (11/01)

Bay Beach Cafe Ferry Landing Marketplace, 1201 First Street, Coronado, 619-435-4900. The dinner menu here has California's typical dumbed-down world-appetizer array, plus salads, pas tas, grilled meats, a few sautée items and children's plates. The restaurant is very family-friendly (full o' kids, actually), with a menu that appeals to the young in mouth: The chef seems to have a sweet tooth, since almost every dish involves honey or sugar — for example, the table butter that's intriguingly flavored with a honey-basil mixture. Your server will tell you about the day's fresh-fish selections. which are more attuned to adult palates with fresh, fine-quality seafood done simply and well. Ultra-noisy inside when crowded; reserve for the lovely terrace with a view of the beach. Open daily, lunch and dinner, with weekend break fast. Moderate to slightly expensive. -N.W. (8/01)

L'Escale Coronado Marriott Island Resort, 2000 Second Street, Coronado, 619-435-3000. Probably the pink flamin gos and bay views bring you here first. But L'Escale ("Port of Call" in French) delivers to the taste buds too. For "Northern Mediterranean cuisine with California flair," read lots of pasta, fish, salads, sandwiches. Try the grilled salmon nicoise salad with its richly sauced fish, crunchy green beans, red potatoes strong olives, and rosemary-flavored bun. Entrées like grilled chicken and mushrooms in Parmesan cream with penne pasta are safe enough. Or bonein filet mignon. But for sheer architecture, check out the tuna salad sandwich wrapped in lavosh: three vertical Armenian bread tubes, angle-sliced to reveal interiors of tuna and greenery. Eat on the pool and bay-surrounded patio if you can. Breakfast, lunch, dinner.

Moderate to expensive. — E.B. (2/03) Merkl's Deli-BBQ 415 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-0767, Named after Sebastian Merkl, the owner's German granddad, who jumped ship in New York after World War I. Merkl's claims to be the "first real New York-style deli south of Hillcrest." It certainly has serious, all-day, New York-type breakfasts like pastrami and corned beef three-egg omelets or Reuben omelets filled with corned beef, Swiss cheese, and sauerkraut. Or salami and eggs, pancake-style. There's even a breakfast Philly cheese steak. But it's not only New York. Out back, their Texas-style smoker burns mesquite for some pretty mean ribs. Also check Chula Vista's truck farm history on the walls, a collection of crate-end labels with all the fruits that this town's soils used to produce. Open every day breakfast through dinner; Sundays breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. -E.B. (10/04)

Spiro's Gyros Ferry Landing, 1201 First Street #4, Coronado, 619-435-1225. The food, the music, the view — are we outside Athens? Is this the Aegean? This inside-outside Greek café is located at the water's edge, and the heated patio has a spectacular view of San Diego, the bay, and the boat traffic. At sunset, sipping their excellent Greek wines (cheaper than their California), watch the sun set the city ablaze in gold. The prices keep Spiro's popular with the locals as well as tourists. Try the moussaka (eggplant casserole) or the souvlaki chicken, mar inated in tzatziki sauce, served with tomatoes, onions, and pita bread. Open seven days until 8 p.m. Inexpensive. E.B. (11/00)

Tango Grille Argentine Steak

House 635 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-0384. Play gaucho and enjoy the most authentic Argentine parrillada (mixed grill) in town at this charming,

warmly decorated bistro about two minutes from the Chula Vista Shopping Center. Fine, smoky wood-grilled Col orado beef appears in several unusual cuts (including succulent steak-cut short-ribs). You can choose from two different mixed grills (sized for one or two), the first with conventional meats, the other - the more adventurous includes organ meats and blood sausage. For starters, there are brilliantly seasoned mini-empanadas of amazing lightness, as well as several interesting salads. Those not in a grilled-meat mood can opt for numerous pastas (including a big, meaty lasagna) or the ubiquitous *milanesa* (breaded beef or chicken patties) of the pampas. Portions are more than generous, and so are the flavors. Open daily. Low moderate. — N.W. (4/02)

Village Pizzeria 1206 Orange Aveoronado, 619-522-0449. In the back. Mootime Creamery makes all its ice cream. In the front, Mootime owner David Spatafore decided to set up what he's always wanted: A cheap, back-east Italian, red-and-white-tablecloth, dangling Chianti bottle eatery where local families and amateur sports teams can come in and pig out. He wisely didn't destroy what was half of the famous old Mexican Village. Instant atmosphere! Ancient murals of guys with guitars serenading señoritas, arches, illuminated clusters of red grapes. The bad news: You might have to handle pumped-up kids' sports teams cramming the booths around you. The good news: Great cal-zones and pizza by the slice. Open lunch through dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. – E.B. (12/04)

BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number

El Cid Lopez Mateos #993 (just off Blancarte), Ensenada, Baja, 646-178-1809. This restaurant is at the heart of the tourist district, but the cooking and service are way above coach class. Look to the "Specialties" section of the huge menu for the most interesting selections. Crisp quail with rose petal sauce (famed from *Like Wa*ter for Chocolate) proves outrageously delicious, and the seasonal chiles en nogada (meat-stuffed poblano chiles with walnut-cream and pomegranate) gain refinement from greaseless ground sir-loin. Fish dishes are fresh, rich, and tender, and you'll find nine different ways to enjoy a steak. If you can handle a tableside production number, crêpes with

cajeta (caramel sauce) makes a very grand finale. Fully bilingual staff; Eng-lish menus available. Sidewalk patio dining available. Reserve for weekends during tourist peaks. Full bar, with ex-cellent margaritas, Baja wines. Open daily, continuous service breakfast through dinner. Moderate. — N.W. (4/03)

La Espadaña Avenida Sánchez Taboada #10813, Zona Río, Tijuana, 634-1488 or 634-1489. If you learn only one word of Spanish, learn this one: Borrego. Because this place does the greatest oven-cooked leg of lamb ever. The meat tastes as if it was cooked in wine, garlic, and herbs, but the owners insist it's just Tecate lamb baked slowly in its own juices with a bit of oregano. But most folks come here for beef steaks and the popular beef fillet, siz-zled at a big flame-and-smoke display counter BBQ grill. All terra-cotta and timber, this is where the local middle classes come for their cross-border food fix. Think Tijuana's version of Mission Valley. Still, it's charming, and you can have fun. For instance, don't forget to ask them to ring the bells set in their *es*padanas (holes cut in the Mission frontage) above the great arched ooden entrance door; they clank tunelessly, but they're great for celebrating your 21st birthday, Mom getting her degree — whatever. Open for breakfast, lunch, dinner, seven days. Moderate. — *E.B.* (11/04)

Mr. Fish Boulevard Agua Caliente #6000, Tijuana, 686-3603. The sign is showing its age and the concept (exotic middle-class restaurant in the middle of a parking lot) seems dated, but twodecade-old Mr. Fish is still serving good fish food. Ask for the Spanish-language menu if you can handle it — it's far more extensive than its poor English cousin. Sit outside under the palm thatch if weather permits. All the basic dishes are good, like octopus in white wine, Lucifer's Oysters with white sauce and smoky chipotle chiles, or the Mr. Fish Combination: half a lobster, fish, shrimp, and calamari. Probably the most popular gringo choice is mahi mahi in lemon-pepper sauce, but consider ordering with salsa eneldo - dill sauce. Also interesting: seafood fettuc-cine "a la Gorvachov" (with vodka) and anything (such as the lobster Mr. Fish or thermidor) with the signature *salsa blanca*. It'll remind you of something (could it be Rubio's?). Open 11 a.m. to 10 p.m., seven days. Moderate. *E.B.* (12/04)

Rica Torta Niños Héroes Avenida #890, between 2nd and 3rd Streets (opposite Dorian's department store), Ti-juana, 685-8579. This café may have the best tortas (call them Mexican-style hamburgers) in Tijuana. Six-inch rashers of marinated carne asada, slices of ham, squares of cheese, chopped salad, tomato slices, fresh-scooped avo-cado...it's a double-wide, double-high burger. The menu has 16 different kinds of tortas, from chorizo with eggs to beefsteak ranchero, all served in huge, three ribbed, crisp-toasted Mexican bread buns. There's other stuff, but to a burger buff, one of these is quite enough. Open seven days. Inexpensive. - E.B. (9/01) Vallarta Natural 1252 Boulevard Agua Caliente (just before El Toreo de Tijuana), 686-1560. Maybe the only

smoke-free restaurant in Tijuana, this vegetarian haven was started in 1996 by health-conscious Doctor Georgina Vallarta de Alcántar. They make their own vogurt, soy hash, breads, rolls, salsas and "meats" like a veal from their own wheat gluten - daily. You sit at wood tables and chairs next to blue-framed vellow walls splattered with Talavera ceramic suns. At breakfast, try the tartaleta vallarta, a mix of eggs, spinach mushrooms, onions, and chile. For lunch (and it's usually busiest around three), their excellent soup, caldo tlalpeno, packed with cheese, rice, avocado, and chile, will fill you nicely. The soy hamburguesa is good, but go for the *torta*, which has that gluten *milanesa* along with cheese, avocado, and jalapeño. Good organic coffee. Wonderful juices, especially the cactus — if you need cleaning out. Open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/06)

This chain has always prided itself on its Italian/California pastas, pizzas, and salads. Now it has gone carnivorous adding marinated flank steak and a rib eye to the "bistro entrées." If you're ordering the flank, well-done is a no-no. That will toughen it. But a rare flank is, well, d'lish in its marination and espe-cially its pesto-like *chimichurri* sauce. Also good: fire-roasted vegetables pizza, where the quick roasting makes for great-tasting, Technicolor-bright broccoli, zucchini, eggplant, and bell peppers. And "Mediterranean chicken salad" works well, partly thanks to the tang of pepperoni chips. Moderate. — E.B. (8/02)

Oggi's At least ten branches all over the suburbs; see phone book for the nearest one. Is it the pizzas or is it the housemade brewskis (six ales, one lager, one stout) that make Oggi's so popular? Is it the sports-bar ambiance (with multiple video screens) or just the near-ubiquity of branches that has won this chain numerous "best pizza" citations? The pizzas are Americanstyle, with thick, slightly sweet crusts, many with elaborate toppings that sound more adventurous than they taste. (All the cheese alternatives are equally mild.) The menu also offers pub snacks, decent soups and salads, hearty sandwiches, and American-Italian entrées so mall-adapted that no *mamma mia* in Bensonhurst or North Beach would even recognize them. avid and Ben, aspiring writers in their mid 20s, meet at a restaurant for a victory celebration. One just broke through. Now you'd think it'd be David. He's dressed more for success - looks like a coun-

selor at an upscale camp, in fact - and does most of the talking: ornate quips and phrasings, as if auditioning each line for literary value.

Ben wears high-end grunge and tends to dismiss hype — and conflict — with his generation's ubiquitous "whatever." When he wrote his novel, Ben didn't care a whit about publication. He had to write it (and could have left it in the desk drawer). So guess which one not only got published but won the lottery: agape reviews, foreign translations, world tour, film rights?

Nope. It was Ben — now known as Benjamin. One of the ironies of The Four of Us by Itamar Moses, currently at the Cassius Carter: David's primed for success. He knows all the players and would fit right in (that he may think way too much about these things, when writing, is also implied). Ben couldn't care less. He's "pop culturally ignorant" and ill-prepared for the lecture circuit. He just did what he had to, he tries to explain, and, unless inspired, may never write again (like Margaret Edson, author of W;t, Ben wrote from need, not want). It's too bad Ben and David couldn't be a before-and-after tandem. Ben digs and grinds and produces a quality work;

then David takes stage and wallows in flashbulbs and flattery. Instead, Ben's seven-figure success drives them apart.


The Four of Us is a sketchy tale told in a jazzy manner. Moses borrows from Tom Stoppard's

Real Thing (some scenes are "real"; others come from David's play) and from Harold Pinter's Betrayal, which moves backward in time. In these nonlinear leaps, Moses

displays a technical virtuosity. It slowly dawns on you that fact and fiction are doing a snakedance. Were the story told in a straightforward manner, however, interest might wane.

Moses, hailed as one of America's top young playwrights, occasionally breaks through his formalist preoccupations with genuine passion. The Four of Us is talky, but the dialogue flows like music and — high praise — like Mamet. At one point David exhorts his audience to take risks and lambastes critics (in some senses, the play's a "revenge comedy" against bad reviews and reviewers). Here the writing catches fire. But there are several annoyingly self-conscious moments as well, including a built-in review of The Four of Us, as if the playwright didn't trust his audience to get it.

Performing on a black floor with a patent leather shine, and aided by two scene changers (who watch the proceedings and might be the early Ben and David), Sean Dugan and Gideon Banner resemble a savvy comedy team, or halves





of the same psyche. Dugan's David is scattered, lacking confidence, always overflowing, as if he has a DJ's fear of "dead air." Banner's self-contained Ben veers toward inscrutability (serious inscrutability: it would have helped to know what his novel was about, since both Ben and David often function more as rhetorical figures, as parts of a pattern, than characters). Under Pam MacKinnon's smart, unfussy direction, the tandem keeps the play watchable by deftly combining different acting styles: Banner suggests; Dugan italicizes.

Success doesn't change Ben in The Four of Us; it changes his friend. In Donald Margulies's Brooklyn Boy, another play about a breakthrough novelist, when Eric Weiss's book becomes #11 on the best-seller list, his whole world falls apart.

Unlike the famous Erich "Houdini" Weiss, Eric is no escape artist. He can't flee his Brooklyn neighborhood and Jewish roots. Not that he doesn't try, though two convoluted novels block his quest. So Eric returns to Brooklyn in fiction. with a best seller, and then returns at the death of his father, in fact. You can anticipate the play's click-your-heels-threetimes ending practically from the get-go. But Brooklyn Boy's more about the journey than

the destination. And in six richly crafted, temperamentally different scenes, Margulies turns what could be stereotyped characters into living, suffering, and often very funny beings. The scenes are almost a dare

to actors: you've got 15 minutes to go out there and create a fully dimensional being. When you leave that stage, we want to feel we've known you forever.

More often than not, the San Diego Rep's actors, under Todd Salovey's thoughtful direction, accomplish the task. By the end of Scene Two, Matthew Henerson has taken Ira, Eric's childhood friend who stayed in Brooklyn, through the zodiac of emotions. Deborah Van Valkenburgh does the cycle with two women: Eric's depressed ex-wife Nina (the saddest person in the play, who might be on an upswing) and Hollywood producer Melanie Fine (the most manic, who wants to take the Brooklyn and Jewish ethnicity out of Eric's script). As Tyler Shaw, Andrew Kennedy does a neat Margulies flip: before we see him, we expect Tyler to be a young, shallow Hollywood star. Then he walks in and, yep - Narcissus with the IQ of an igneous rock. But when Tyler reads a scene from the script, he becomes what Eric's been looking for all along: an authentic voice.

On opening night, James Newcomb got a lot of Eric Weiss, but there's more to inhabit (especially the throughline: from passive/reactive to assertive). Robert Levine, as Eric's ailing father Manny, and Christy Yael, as first-time groupie Alison, provide telling moments. Yael gets another Margulies flip. In a play that excels with mature dramaturgy, young Alison confidently asserts that "fiction is, like, so over."

Ace

One of the unwritten rules of theater: never let the audience get ahead of the story. If they can anticipate where you're going, you've lost them. Ace, a musical about flying and lost children and inept mothers, tells two stories, but they're the same story told twice. Fathers fly and die. Their sons grow up to be pilots. The musical depicts life-shattering events but never takes them beyond the generic - and manipulates them

for easy emotions. Richard Oberacker's music's on a launching pad: rocketing into the upper registers at full volume. One number like this would be stirring ("I Know It Can Be Done," sung with Power of Positive Thinking conviction by Darren Ritchie, for example). But every song rages to uplift with epic feelings. The auditory overload's so pummeling you may not notice, in the end, that Ace has resolved almost every contradiction in the known universe. In the midst of the din. possibly because he's doing the opposite, young Noah Galvin gives a mesmerizing performance as Billy, identity-seeking foster child. Ace wants to engulf its audience. Galvin brings them in, with subtle facial expressions and minimal body language. He's genuinely confused and hurt (having to wear red Converse All-Star sneakers in 1952, when they didn't exist, would confuse ANY-ONE!). You'd think that a musical about the early decades of flight would have vivid theatrical representations of its subject. But when pilots take to the skies, director Stafford Arima and choreographer Andrew Palermo ground them with unimaginative miming: running in circles, crouching and turning, pumping their hands for machine guns - like kids playing in the back vard. Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terrible Turks mangled defrocked priests, while mums and dads yelled insults and grannies waved their handbags"). National Comedy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic director Gary Kramer says the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a challenge match against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze

Worth a try.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv, making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but the "game show" — on Fridays — is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" — two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" — five directors invented scenes, using the other four

Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledge failure, abundantly, then forget it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented

There's "something wrong inside" Misselthwaite Manor, where the midnight wind goes "wuthering." Everything, not just Master Archibald's large garden, is walled off. Nothing dares to bloom. Francis Hodgson Burnett's 1911 novel joins a survivor, young Mary Lennox, with imaginary invalid

Colin; they circumvent the rules of their elders and banish gloom. Lamb's Players' production, of the musical adaptation, begins and ends with Deborah Gilmour Smyth's bell-clear singing voice, like a radiant candle in darkness. inviting us to "Come to My Garden." Smyth sets a tone of enchantment that makes it easier to overlook a somewhat lumpy book (and what feels like four "eleven o'clock" numbers when the climax beckons). Strong voices run throughout the cast: David S. Humphrey's hunchbacked Archibald, Randall Dodge's quasivillainous Neville, and Mike Buckley's Albert. That's the same Mike Buckley who designs sets for Lamb's and has done a beautiful job here - pointed gothic windows, roseate, see-through screens (which allow the play's chorus of "Dreamers," who may be ghosts, to waft in and out). As has Nathan Pierson's evanescent, gobo-rich lighting, Jeanne Reith's costumes, and a sharp five-piece band. Director Robert Smyth gives the evening a gentle flow (having scene-changers often exit down steps centerstage is a brilliant idea; like the

ghosts, they just disappear). Smyth also had the smarts to encourage a leavening effect: to prevent the evening from becoming too breathless, young performers Allie Trimm (Mary) and Austyn Myers (Colin) play bickering brats.

Worth a try.

Triple Espresso: A Highly Caffeinated Comedy

Hugh Butternutt's done his lounge act at the Triple Espresso Coffeehouse 20 years to the day. While patrons sip a house blend — "Grape," "Scandinavian Blizzard," or "Mokoko Cocoa Mocha" Hugh plays '70s tunes on the piano. He and his companions, here to celebrate Hugh's anniversary, got stuck in the '70s. The trio used to be Maxwell, Butternutt, and Bean, a comedy group that never went far. They're "losers," they admit, but not "ordinary" ones. And, hey, their reunion could help them face searing issues from their mediocre pasts. A formulaic story line? Yep. Straight from Forever Plaid. There's also the Forever Plaid problem: the three comedians are far too talented to play inept characters. One's a whiz at the piano. Another's a first-rate mime, and the third's a crackerjack magician.

The trio is so talented, when the plot has them complain of difficulties to overcome, you wish they'd quit trumping up the pseudodrama and get on with this highly entertaining, if lightweight show. (Note: the original cast members have been replaced.) Worth a try.

Hay temor

La psicosis por los secuestros y la criminalidad en Tijuana ha regresado luego de una aparente calma por el patrullaje en las calles de grupos de oficiales federales y militares. Pese a la presencia de éstos en la ciudad como parte del "Operativo Tijuana", autoridades locales han revelado nuevos plagios y 29 asesinatos en lo que va de este año.

Las ejecuciones no sólo han sido de miembros de mafias que traicionaron a su grupo, conocidos como "levantados", o adictos en plena ansiedad; también son de víctimas de secuestros, que aun cuando sus familias pagaron rescates los cautivos no fueron regresados con vida.

La Procuraduria General de Justicia del Estado (PGJE), la fiscalia que se encarga de investigar estos delitos, no ha querido revelar cuántos secuestros ha habido durante estos días del 2007 bajo el argumento que dar a conocer los casos podría entorpecer las investigaciones que se llevan a cabo.

Sin embargo, el secretario de Seguridad Pública Municipal de Tijuana, Luis Javier Algorri Franco, declaró que siguen ocurriendo secuestros en la ciudad y al menos tres personas fueron plagiadas durante el pasado fin de semana.

Spy in the Ointment

We can never really understand the man, but we can revel in him.

ollowing up *Shattered Glass* with *Breach*, director Billy Ray has made a good start on a pet theme, the human, or peculiarly American, proclivity for deceit. The first, you will recall, told the factual

story of the fabricating journalist, Stephen Glass, of *The New Republic*. The second, coming to town on

Friday, tells the factual story of the dissembling FBI double agent, Robert Hanssen, the bureau's self-styled expert on the Soviets and secret bedfellow of them, the architect of "the worst breach in the history of U.S. intelligence," in the intemperate words of the colleague commissioned to seal the breach. The factuality cuts two ways. It curbs the extravagances of the James Bond branch of espionage capers, but it also curbs the excitement, the thrills. With the traitor's arrest a foregone conclusion (a preludial clip of John Ashcroft on television provides reassurance rather than, more usually for a member of the Bush administration, an invitation to hiss), the film becomes more a character

study than a cloak-and-dagger operation; and because of the nature of the character, it devolves into an accumulation of oddities and crotchets, inescapably more mirthful than suspenseful. We can never really understand the man, but we can

Chris Cooper, adding another prominent portrait to his impres-

sive gallery, a showpiece to outshine even those of Adaptation, Capote, Seabiscuit, Lone Star, captures fully the nondescriptness and anonymity that John le Carré treasures in a spy; and the churchy suit and haircut, to go along with the prissily pursed lips and piercing beady eyes, are no mere disguise. A devout and ostentatious Catholic (lapsed Lutheran), a vigilant paranoid, a humorless megalomaniac, he is a man brimming with opinions: "I disapprove of women in pantsuits.... The world doesn't need another Hillary Clinton." (The actress Catherine Zeta-Jones, a video favorite of his, is something else again: "She's very appealing.") The sounding board, and surreptitious brain-picker, for




these opinions is a young agent in training, Jesuit-schooled, assigned to the suspected turncoat as a personal assistant, with the understanding at first that he is sniffing out nothing worse than sexual deviancy. That turns out to be true, too, although apart from a covert bedroom video of himself and his wife, peddled through the mail, Hanssen's deviancy is played down. (Much farther down, if memory serves, than in the 2002 TV miniseries on the same subject, *Master Spy: The Robert Hanssen Story*, with the transparent William Hurt in the lead role, and a hack screenplay by no one less than Norman Mailer.) Ryan Phillippe as the FBI fledgling is tightly clamped, and appropriately so; and Laura Linney, as his manipulative su-

perior, effectively banishes any personal warmth. Rooting interest is therefore minimal, snooping interest substantial.

The Lives of Others, the German nominee for Best Foreign Film, wisely ushered into town before it predictably becomes an Oscar loser, takes us back to the bad old days of the Berlin Wall and the Big Brother tactics of the GDR

secret police, the Stasi. The case in point: a Party pooh-bah has the hots for a celebrated stage actress and, to clear the way, orders some dirt dug up on her playwright boyfriend, an apparently loyal socialist of spotless reputation despite his openly subversive friends and despite, too, his openly snooty manner. Ulrich Tukur, so memorable as the conscience-stricken Nazi of Amen, is good again in the less complex and less sympathetic role of the bureaucratic brownnoser who heads up the investigation. But the better role and better performance belong to another Ulrich, last name Mühe, coincidentally the conscienceless Doctor Mengele of Amen, now playing the relentless bullet-headed interrogator charged to carry out the dirty work, taking it all in (including the indiscretions of the higher-ups), giving nothing away, keeping his opinions to himself, eventually keeping his findings to himself as well, crawling a long way out on a limb. Martina Gedeck and Sebastian Koch as actress and playwright have some complexity, too, to complement and compromise their outward artiness. Watching it all unfold is more than passably interesting, if not particularly to look at (nauseously green), and even though the run-on epilogue is rather cumbersome. The new-name filmmaker bears a name befitting the monocle-brandishing antagonist in a Viennese operetta, Florian Henckel von Donnersmarck.

Breaking and Entering, the latest Anthony Minghella film, boasts a cast assembled from past Anthony Minghella films, Jude Law from Cold Mountain and The Talented Mr. Ripley, Ray Winstone from Cold Mountain only, Juliette Binoche from The English Patient, Juliet Stevenson from Truly Madly Deeply, plus new recruits Robin Wright Penn and, in an entertaining turn as an immigrant streetwalker, Vera Farmiga, all of whom are cosseted in a closeup-happy style and flattered in nice, soft, gentle lighting (by Benoît Delhomme). The plot centers around an affluent but alienated and abstracted urban developer, married, with an autistic, gymnastic child, and headquartered in an insufficiently gentrified section of Kings Cross, where his swanky offices are repeatedly burgled. (The break-in technique, which points a misleading finger at an inside job, is quite an eye-opener.) When, however, he independently tracks down the culprit, he finds himself willing to overlook the crime in order to get a closer look at the criminal's mother, a beautiful sad-eyed war widow from Sarajevo. In the hands of the late author of The Talented Mr. Ripley, Patricia Highsmith, this situation would doubtless have generated strong suspense and sticky psychology. In the hands of Anthony Minghella, who wrote the screenplay himself, it mainly generates stylish angst.

The latest word on Miss Potter (reviewed in these pages two weeks ago when it was initially set to open) is that it has now been put off until March, to get clear of the jostling of Oscar contenders. Translation: the schemers at the Weinstein Company had hoped Miss Potter would itself be an Oscar contender and when it wasn't, they didn't know what to do with it.

Apocalypto - Evidently Mel Gibson is in it only for the barbarity. Scouring the globe, roaming the pages of history, he has alighted here on the illuminating example of the Mayan people, past their civilized peak, where a happy, peaceable, practicaljoking tribe of jungle dwellers (sample joke: the prescription of a red-hot herb as a topical fertility drug, so that the duped hubby must, in full view of the guffawing villagers, hop around buck naked and plunk down his burning loins in a water trough - wait, it gets even better - and his wife must pour a pitcher of water down her gullet) is cruelly set upon and rounded up by a storm troop of fearsome, bloodthirsty, bone-inthe-nose killjoys in search of sacrificial offerings to their god Kukulkan. A paradise, in other words, no less than turn-of-the-13th-century Scotland in Braveheart or 1stcentury Palestine in The Passion of the Christ, where Gibson may indulge his ap petite for mayhem, persecution, torture, martyrdom. (The nine-tenths-naked natives enable him, further, to indulge his lesser appetite for homoerotica.) The English subtitles and the no-name cast might almost lead you to believe, were it not for the telltale slickness and the Gibsonian slomo for dramatic stress, that you're watch-

ing a product of, say, the Guatemalan New Wave or the Undiscovered Belizean Cinema. At the very least, the film should do nothing to fan the flames of Gibson's suspected and substantiated anti-Semitism. And at the next least, the last-minute arrival on the scene of Christianity is not openly - and politically incorrectly applauded. That might be the film's one and only instance of restraint. Babel — Communication problems the world over. An American tourist is struck by rifle fire in Morocco, arousing erroneous worries of terrorism. An illegal-alien nanny drags along the two towheads in her care to a Mexican wedding, and runs afoul of the Border Patrol on their return. And a horny pantyless deaf-mute Japanese girl can't get a man, any man, to take an interest in her. These three storvlines are fashionably "interlocked" (anyone who can recognize the voice of Brad Pitt over the telephone will immediately know the connection between two of them), and the film strategically ends in the same place, from a different point of view, as it begins, coming full circle. The illusion of complexity, for all that, could scarcely be more transparent. Mexican director Alejandro González Iñárritu, much in the manner of his Amores Perros. achieves depth only in the way that a hero sandwich achieves it; and it achieves

length — almost two and a half hours of it - in the same way as a footlong at any Subway shop. Tenuous in construction, slack and sluggish in pace, sketchy and farfetched in plot, the film does nothing to justify its epic length or its cosmic ambitions. (The Mexican storyline, particularly weak, goes nowhere until it goes bananas: a series of decisions so bad as to forfeit all sympathy for the characters, let alone for the storyteller who compelled the characters to make the decisions.) With a somewhat calmer camera than his norm, however, the director does some nice scene-setting, some impressionistic documentation of the locales, to help realize his goal in sheer duration. their five-millennia reign in Romania, the present population of werewolves, apart from one pair of parental figures, and pretty hip ones at that, seems to consist solely of the sort of crowd you'd expect to encounter at the local disco. (The German director, Katja von Garnier, is familiar over here chiefly for the punk-feminist Bandits.) The heroine, a chocolatier by day, is the rebel of the pack, a resister of tradition, a quiet questioner; and she finds a kindred spirit, and a verboten beau, in a merely human American expatriate who's researching lycanthrope lore for one of his "graphic novels." Agnes Bruckner and Hugh Dancy are a reasonably appealing couple, as youths go; but no matter how revisionist, there can be no place in a werewolf movie for a pop-song montage of cavorting lovers sunbathing in the park, drenching themselves in a public fountain, etc. The cleverest idea in the movie may be the selection of a film studio as a hiding place from werewolves, sure to be put off by the silver component in photographic processing. But then it doesn't seem quite so clever when one of the parental figures, for that very reason, picks the film studio as the first place to look. Blood Diamond — Serviceable actionadventure despite frequent interruptions for sermonettes on human rights and capitalist wrongs. The ripped-from-the-headlines story (yesterday's headlines: civil war in Sierra Leone, 1999) features the stock figures of a self-interested soldier of fortune, in league with slaughterous rebels and unscrupulous jewellers, an engagé foreign correspondent, and a hapless native peasant enslaved in the diamond mines and separated from his family, all united on a treasure hunt for a priceless buried gem, "a pink," big as a walnut. Without the politics, the strong-arm manipulation of emotions would be inexcusable. Or rather, more clearly inexcusable. It's still inexcusable even now. (The on-screen standing ovation at the final curtain is an unsubtle elbow-inthe-ribs to the moviegoer.) Behind the oped posturing, the film roughly resembles a




middle-period, middle-drawer Robert Mitchum vehicle, except that Leonardo Di-Caprio, affecting an acceptable Afrikaner accent, is no Robert Mitchum. For all his recently acquired bulk, including the heftiness of his credits in Martin Scorsese's oeuvre, he remains too boyish to be a persuasive action hero: Robby Bensonitis, let's call it. Jennifer Connelly, meantime, is both capable and decorative as the journalist. And the only thing keeping Djimon Hounsou from total sympathy is the sanctimony in which his director, Edward Zwick, enwraps him. All three, along with their Dark Continent environs, are nicely, cleanly, warmly photographed by Eduardo Serra. 2006. ★ (GASLAMP 15)

Borat: Cultural Learnings of America for Make Benefit Glorious Nation of Kazakhstan — For anyone who heretofore hadn't encountered the character on HBO, Borat Sagdiyev will need an introduction. He is one of the personas of British comedian Sacha Baron Cohen on Da Ali G Show, a Kazakh TV reporter dapperly dressed in a dove-gray suit, bristlingly mustachioed, blissfully sexist, superstitiously anti-Semitic, and not yet toilettrained (he splashes water on his face from the commode in his New York hotel room, takes a doggy-style dump in the bushes of a public park, jerks off in front of a Victoria's Secret display window, and so on), ostensibly dispatched to America to shoot a documentary for home consumption - a builtin excuse for bad camerawork. Scripted scenes, or at any rate pre-planned scenes, primarily involving Borat's obese and camera-shy producer, Azamat Bagatov (Ken Davitian), secondarily involving a slightly less obese African-American call girl (Luenell), and presumably also involving the proprietors of a Jewish B&B (how can we be sure?), alternate with unscripted performance-art pieces, so to call them, in which assorted innocents, dupes, patsies, and joke-butts are lured into the gag unawares. These unrehearsed bits, no doubt more compelling, more riveting, more nerve-racking than the planned-out parts, naturally give rise to thoughts of their comedic antecedents and analogues: Candid Camera, the practical jokes on a Dick Clark Bloopers special, MTV's copycat Punk'd, the crank calls of any wisenheimer

radio deejay, Andy Kaufman's chauvinistpig wrestling career, the Yes Men (and their eponymous film of a couple of years previous), etc. At the same time, they give rise to moral concerns - to say nothing of legal ones - that far overshadow artistic ones. Can, as an example, an Alabama minister's wife - bluntly insulted for her dearth of pulchritude - be safely assumed to be less of a human being than our fearless guerrilla artiste, or has the latter's sexism perhaps crossed over, there, from fiction into reality? Any diversion afforded by such thoughts is all to the good, because the general impression of the film, right down to the spottiness of its laughs, and regardless of whether staged or not, is amazingly similar to that of your average Will Ferrell comedy. Catch and Release - Romantic seriocomedy to do with a scheduled wedding turned funeral and the stranded bride's posthumous discovery that her intended groom had a secret big bank account and a secret small child. (They had seemed such a perfect couple: she's called Gray, he was called Grady.) If writer and director Susannah Grant had wanted, as she appears to have wanted, to steer the thing toward the Lifetime Channel, she would have been advised to hire a warmer-blooded leading lady than the fish-lipped, marble-skulled, enamel-skinned, steel-eyed Jennifer Garner. It might seem odd, at the same time, to see the indie filmmaker Kevin "Silent Bob" Smith in the cookie-cutter role of the comical tubby Best Friend, persistently plugging Celestial Seasonings teas via T-shirt, mug, quotable quotations from the boxes, and place of employment. Then again, once you begin to recollect his own sorties into the mainstream, be they ever so futile - Jersey Girl, Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back, Clerks II - it ought to seem significantly less odd. Children of Men — The basic idea from a novel by P.D. James, a departure from her detective fiction - of a worldwide plague of female infertility, even though not at all original (see The Handmaid's Tale, as a prime example), remains nevertheless a potent metaphor for that science-fiction staple, the End of the World; and the film can thus sensibly refrain from hashing over the significance of a miraculous pregnancy in England, as inexplicable as the plague itself, eighteen years after its onset in 2008. A potent metaphor, that, for Hope, even Faith. (The young black woman's deadpan protestation of virginity is of course only her own little joke. What she is carrying is not the Second Coming of Christ so much as that of Adam. Or, as it happens, Eve.) Because the world went so fast to hell so near in the future — "Only Britain soldiers on" - the film is not overburdened with production and special effects. It shoulders just sufficient texture and detail for an illusion of reality: the unswept litter and uncollected trash in the streets, the electronic animated billboards, the pirated artworks preserved for no one's edification at the Tate Modern, the gratis government-issued suicide kits (brand name: Quietus; ad slogan: "You Decide When"), the concentration camps for illegal aliens, etc. There is really not much in the way of a story — underground dissidents squiring the expectant mother through chaotic countryside to an offshore rendezvous with a shadowy do-good organization known as the Human Project - but Clive Owen, the principal squirer, an uncommitted mercenary, has the ideal demeanor for the grimness of the mission; and the trek is nothing if not eventful, a mild word for an itinerary that includes three virtuoso action set pieces. If the camera sometimes calls attention to itself with its showboat mobility, and at one point with its blood-spattered lens, the staging of the action is always thorough and thought-out. As, for that matter, is the staging of the nonaction, in particular the hero's interplay with his exwife (Julianne Moore) and an aged flowerchild friend (Michael Caine), abubble with emotional undercurrents. Director Alfonso Cuarón's moderation in the use of closeups, a rarer and rarer thing these days, disdains the easy way out. The Departed — Martin Scorsese's career-changing turn to the overblown epic, a turn marked by Casino, would seem to be a course difficult to reverse. Kundun . Gangs of New York ... The Aviator.... And now even a trashy light diversion, adapted from an average-length Hong Kong action film, will get dragged out to two and a half hours - this despite the delivery of dialogue at the machine-gun tempo of a hopped-up auctioneer (or of Scorsese's own casual conversation), and despite, too, the mere semblance of speed imparted by the free-associative cutting and the incongruous rockabilly beat of the background music, whenever the filmmaker isn't trotting out his collection of rock-and-roll oldies. The convoluted plot verges on farce: an upwardly mobile underworld spy in the Massachusetts State Police (Matt Damon, raising his eyebrows in an ostentatious show of innocence) and a downwardly mobile police spy inside the mob (Leonardo DiCaprio, giving himself away with his meat-cleaver worry line) both become involved, first as clients and then as suitors, with a Harper's Bazaar idea of a psychotherapist (Vera Farmiga, she of the prow-like cheekbones, life-raft lips, blue-lagoon eyes). Not even the take-no-prisoners crescendo of gore toward the end, jolting though some of it is, can pull the movie back from the farcical brink. And Jack Nicholson, as showy an actor as Scorsese is a director (when he's only in it for the money, anyway), plays the mob boss at a pitch barely below his Batman Joker. Dreamgirls - Broadway backstage musical - not, that is to say, backstage on Broadway but backstage in Motown charting the breakthrough of R&B into the pop mainstream in the Sixties, more specifically the rise of a girl group called the Dreams (rhymes with Supremes), and attendant heartbreaks, breakups, downfalls, and assorted other banalities. True, a musical can get away with a banal storyline if the music is good, but these Broadway-ized soul tunes are as insipid as they are incessant. It seems it's not easy to write another "Where Did Our Love Go?," another "Come See about Me," another "My World Is Empty without You," another "You Can't Hurry Love." And the one familiar number, the one unforgotten number, the big abandonment solo of former American Idol contestant Jennifer Hudson (big voice, big figure), screams out for earplugs if not a muzzle. Neither is it easy, evidently, to be another Aretha Franklin. Bevoncé Knowles looks glamorous enough as the Diana Ross diva who metamorphoses into disco queen Donna Summer (under the Svengalian guidance of the Berry Gordy stand-in, Jamie Foxx); and the period clothes and hairdos - something near a beehive on Eddie Murphy when we first meet him, higher and higher than Jackie Wilson are enjoyable as expected. Writer and director Bill Condon, who adapted the screenplay for Chicago but whose own directing credits run to Gods and Monsters and Kinsey, shows it's not easy to be Stanley Donen. 2006.

The positive attitude and right-mindedness of the film, or at least the enthusiasm and resolve of Hilary Swank in the lead role, are disarming if not shaming. And Imelda Staunton puts up pitiable resistance as the rule-bound department head, a very human heavy. The Good German — A nostalgist's film noir, one more black-and-white postwar thriller, over a half-century tardy in its arrival, for the buff who has run through Crossfire, Cornered, Notorious, The Stranger, Berlin Express, and Captain Carey, U.S.A., among numerous others, and who still has a hunger. Reassuring archaisms, such as the 4:3 aspect ratio for the opening credits (afterwards widened only to 1.66:1, it looks like) or the blatant rear-screen projection behind a stationary moving car, coexist un easily with latter-day liberties in matters of sex and profanity. Steven Soderbergh, who had dabbled in black-and-white before (most of Kafka, most of his sequence in Eros, but never till now whole hog), knows where to place the low angles and inky shadows, though he doesn't know so well how to maintain pace and flow. George Clooney, who also had had black-andwhite experience in his self-directed Good Night, and Good Luck, fits right in, thanks to his "classical" movie-star good looks, scuffed up a bit in repeated beatings; and Cate Blanchett, as a Berlin prostitute with a presumed-dead but intensively sought husband, seems to be able to adapt herself to anything, including the German language with English subtitles. Hannibal Rising — Soft on cannibalism. But after all, Hannibal Lecter has made a lot of money for Hollywood, a powerful argument for clemency. Mostly boring and senseless, the prequel to The Silence of the Lambs (and Hannibal and Red Dragon) busies itself with mitigating circumstances Surely any reasonable man can understand why another man - a WWII orphan grown up — would want to eat the men who ate his little sister, especially if they were Nazi collaborators at the time and white slavers now. The French actor Gaspard Ulliel makes a poor substitute for Anthony Hopkins, though he just might make the grade as a sub for Crispin Glover. Even when film was silent, there was music to accompany it supplied by either piano or pit orchestra. As a musician, my favorite films, not surprisingly, have interesting soundtracks. The Third Man by Carol Reed has a score performed by Anton Karas on zither, which itself becomes an integral character of the film, providing comments on the action.

Jean Cocteau's La Belle et la Bête has lovely music by Georges Auric, but the real interest for me in the available DVD is the included alternate score by Philip Glass that I was fortunate to hear performed live by the composer with a showing of the film.

Forbidden Planet, a science-fiction film based on Shakespeare's The Tempest with a score composed by Louis and Bebe Barron, might be the first commercial film whose entire soundtrack is electronic music.

The best film I can think of that reflects the exciting and sometimes overwrought world of the performing arts is Meeting Venus. A brilliant performance by Glenn Close as an opera diva highlights this comedy of tangled love and a young conductor's first big break at a major opera house. Unfortunately, it's not yet available on DVD, but I hope this will encourage people to ask for it.

Some of my favorite film music from the past several years comes from Star Wars, Episode I: The Phantom Menace. This film is definitely available on DVD, and it's worthwhile if only to listen closely to John Williams's exciting "Battle of the Fates" choral and orchestral fireworks.

I would also recommend Ushpizin, and not just for the music. You don't have to be Jewish or even religious to enjoy this movie about having your faith - in God or man - tested.

Silent films were never truly silent. Organ, chamber, or orchestral accompaniments underscored emotion and set and transitioned scenes - often to a greater degree than modern soundtracks. You can experience this live as the Symphony presents the silent classic Ben-Hur. I'd like to recommend The Wind, starring the greatest of all silent actresses, Lillian Gish, for its use of music to conjure up a devastating force we cannot see on a lonely Texas plain. But the film's not available on DVD.

Fritz Lang's *Metropolis* is certainly one of the best-known silent classics and certainly available on DVD. But I'm partial to the controversial 1984 "enhancement" of the film featuring Giorgio Moroder's reimagined pop soundtrack and beautiful color tinting.

Finally, there's Guy Maddin's amazing Dracula: Pages from a Virgin's Diary. The film combines ballet, horror. silent-era film technique, modern computer effects, and an all-Mahler soundtrack to breathtaking effect.

And you cannot feel entirely happy about a happy ending in which it's suggested that humans might show more respect for their fellow creatures on the planet if only the fellows would learn some nifty dance steps. Although the direction by live-action man George Miller has some nice touches and clever angles, the action, approximately 60mph faster than the action in his Mad Max movies, is approximately 65mph too fast. Letters from Iwo Jima — The second part of Clint Eastwood's Second World War diptych, the Japanese-language, Japanese-perspective counterpart to Flags of Our Fathers, an exercise in empathy whereby the filmmaker re-examines the same subject, the costly Battle of Iwo Jima, from the opposite side of the firing line. For an American production to attempt to view an American war through the eyes of the other guys - to attempt to portray the sameness, the oneness, of fighting men on whatever side - is in itself nothing new. It is, by one gauge, as old as the prototypical antiwar film, All Quiet on the Western Front, although that one, or any of its successors (A Time to Love and a Time to Die, The Blue Max, etc.), didn't attempt to do so in the other guys' native tongue. In addition to which, any number of films have attempted an internal balancing act, our side and theirs, sometimes even permitting the others to speak in their own tongues (The Young Lions, The Enemy Below, Hell in the Pacific, Tora! Tora! Tora!, etc.). More, then, than in the opposing-viewpoint angle or the foreign-language angle, the uniqueness of Letters lies in its distinction as part of a matched pair, an external balancing act if you will, sharing numerous points of intersection with Flags while sharing no actual cast members. (The momentous flag-raising on Mount Suribachi now rates as no more than a speck in the distance.) The singularity of Letters, paradoxically put, lies in its complementarity. It is much more a

straightforward battle film than its predecessor, which was more a memory film of battle and had as much to do with the after effects as with the immediate effects, filing away the warfare as indelible mental snapshots. Too, it comes across as a bit preachier than Flags, where the filmmaker, with firmer footing on home turf, may have felt freer to let you draw your own lessons, may have felt less necessity to show his personal "understanding." Nonetheless, it offers a useful, a purposeful, a further refinement of his evolving views on violence. And if it runs the risk of collapse under the cumulative weight of his solemnity (four and a half hours over the course of two movies), the risk proves to have been a risk worth taking, a risk rewarded. Little Children — Todd Field's sophomore directing effort, following up his quietly sensationalized In the Bedroom, is less quietly sensationalized, in other words more blaringly sensationalized, and truly more sophomoric. The adaptation of a Tom Perrotta novel, complete with a snooty third-person-omniscient (i.e., know-it-all) narrator, undoubtedly tells us less about the malaise of our young middleclass suburban parents today than about the jaded palates of our moviegoers and/or moviemakers. An adulterous playground liaison — between a killingly handsome Mr. Mom (Patrick Wilson, with his New man-esque blue eyes and jutting upper lip), a graduate of law school but a flunker of the bar exam, and a latter-day Madame Bovary (Kate Winslet, the sleeker edition), who, married to a clod, champions her literary forerunner as a proto-feminist in her book discussion group - cannot be considered sufficiently spicy without the added tang of a neighborhood sex offender, a vigilante excop with innocent blood on his hands, and a married Internet porn addict in secret correspondence with Slutty Kay. To have three separate male characters masturbate on screen on three separate occasions must set some sort of record. And there's not even any clear evidence of developing skills since the director's freshman effort, which really was praised too highly, perhaps too intoxicatingly. See, for example, the flashcut fusillade of innocuous bric-a-brac at the outset. Or see the overly choreographed scene at the public swimming pool when the sex offender's arrival in snorkel and flippers gets everyone out of the water faster than if he were a Great White accompanied by the theme from Jaws. Or see the treatment of the night-league amateur football players, through distorting wide-angle lenses, as sneering bruisers suitable for an Adam Sandler comedy. Music and Lyrics — Enough laughs in the first few minutes to sustain two or three average screen comedies: a music-video parody of the signature tune of a British bubblegum group of the Eighties — "Pop Goes My Heart" by Pop!, from beginning to end — with Hugh Grant shimmying, shaking, and pogosticking in a long-hair wig. Cut to the present, when he's "a happy has-been," finished with songwriting ("It's so time-consuming"), content to re-do the oldies for class reunions, amusement parks, whoever will have him. But then the world's hottest female soloist (a dimpled blond newcomer named Haley Bennett), a Madonna-esque amalgam of Eastern religions and Western decadence, commissions him to write her a song on spec - she's indebted to Pop! for helping her through her parents' split at age seven - and he begins an impromptu collaboration, and romance, with his temporary plant-waterer, Drew Barrymore. These are two actors with polished acts, and they both seem to be playing up to their own fan clubs rather than each other. The energy falls off right around the midpoint, but writer-director Marc Lawrence has his own sort of polish, and the image maintains a constant sheen. Night at the Museum — Jumanji-esque jumble of special effects, in which all the exhibits at the Natural History Museum in New York City come to life after dark. This allows for a lot of, frankly an excess of, variety: Lilliputian cowboys and Roman soldiers who tie down the new night watchman like Gulliver; a mischievous monkey who pees on him, pickpockets his keys, and engages in a Three Stooges-style slapfest with him; a T-rex skeleton who wants to play fetch; a talking, bubblegum-chewing Easter Island head; Attila and some Huns; some lions, an elephant, a zebra, a rhino, and so on. It also allows for logical mix-ups whereby, for example, the wax figure of Teddy Roosevelt knows full well he's a wax figure of our twenty-sixth President, while the wax figure of Sakajawea is regarded as the actual, taxidermized Indian maid, a boon to the tour guide who is writing a dissertation on her. Director Shawn Levy oversees one decent cinematic moment, the contrasting views of the Lilliputians letting the air out of the tires of a van at the load ing dock, an action which at close range looks as if they're trying to plug a hole in the fuselage of a jetliner at 30,000 feet, while from a distance it looks as if all is calm. Mickey Rooney has a nice little role as a truculent security guard forced into retirement (addressing his replacement vari-ously as "Hotshot," "Hopscotch," "Butterscotch," etc.), and Ricky Gervais, of the British The Office, shows off his narrow range to good effect as another embarrassing boss, the high-handed museum director ("Control your young, please"). Ben Stiller, on the other hand, shows off his own narrow range at great length in the lead role, and Robin Williams (the wax Teddy) and Owen Wilson (toy cowboy) are instantaneously tiresome. Notes on a Scandal — Two thespian heavyweights, Cate Blanchett and Judi Dench, going toe to toe, battling to a draw The scandal, as it comes to light, is the illicit and illegal affair of a married-with-children, thirty-something art teacher, Blanchett, and a fifteen-year-old male student (Andrew Simpson), a ripped-fromthe-headlines affair made perfectly plausible if not comprehensible. What doesn't come fully to light, except to the voyeuristic viewer, is how a self-deluding lonely old lesbian history teacher, Dench, attempts to use her knowledge of the affair to her own advantage, again perfectly plausible if not exactly politically correct. Both of the women are individuals, not representatives, and they're played that way. The drama gets a bit overwrought toward the finish, and Philip Glass's phone-it-in musical score is no asset, but all in all a compelling effort. The Painted Veil — Somerset

Maugham's middlebrow brew of sin and redemption among colonial Brits in mid-Twenties China, where a brave bacteriologist but vindictive cuckold (Edward Norton) drags his faithless spouse (Naomi Watts) into the midst of a cholera outbreak in the backcountry. The spiritual growth of the flighty wife ("When love and duty are one," counsels the Mother Superior at the local orphanage, "then grace is within you") will restore sufficient happiness to the union, not long before its tragic end, that the husband can stop plastering down his hair and go fluffy. Directed by John Curran (We Don't Live Here Anymore, also featuring Watts), this follows after at least two other screen treatments of the novel the better known of which is one of the lesser Garbo vehicles - and, for all its location shooting and its air of "independence," it's still stiff and stuffy. Much of that is intrinsic to the original author, and some of it's imported through the stagy British accents of the stars. With Liev Schreiber, Toby Jones, and Diana Rigg. 2006. (LA IOLLA VILLAGE)

Pan's Labyrinth — Guillermo del Toro, the migrant Mexican filmmaker, returns to the place and time of his Spanish Civil War ghost story, The Devil's Backbone, more precisely post-Civil War, mid-WWII. He centers on a preadolescent girl (wide-eyed, plump-lipped Ivana Baquero) chided by her nine-months-pregnant mother (Ariadna Gil, very intense) as too old to be still filling her head with the "nonsense" of fairy tales, especially since she has moved beneath the roof of her wicked stepfather (Sergi López, campily over the top), a Francoist martinet busily stamping out rebels in the woods, who has little tolerance for a child of another bloodline but is eager to get his leather-sheathed hands on his biological baby in his wife's womb. Much more welcoming of the little girl is the mythological faun (real or imagined?), the guardian of the off-limits garden, who identifies the newcomer straight off as the prodigal daughter of the King of the Underworld (what are the odds?). Del Toro, almost in spite of himself, is not altogether guiltless of conventional, parental, puritanical strictures against fairy tales. In his scrupulous, perhaps overscrupulous, balance of dark fantasy and brutal history, tilted (politically, diplomatically) a little toward the latter, he leaves nothing to chance. He establishes the Importance of his theme through the unassailable realm of Fascists and freedom fighters, and he connects that world to the parallel universe of fairy tales in a way that can best be termed didactic, academic, studied, possibly stifling. He makes a case. He does not make magic. Far more than The Devil's Backbone, the film that keeps coming to mind, always to this one's disadvantage, is Victor Erice's Spirit of

the Beehive, 1973. That one, having in com-



mon a post-Civil War backdrop and a gullible little girl, made very much the same points, together with others, and made them more subtly, more ambiguously, more poetically; made them, moreover, while Franco was still in power; and made them without recourse to special effects beyond a Halloween get-up of Frankenstein's monster. Del Toro never lets his special effects here, some of them pretty tacky and icky, take over to the same extent as in his comic-book Hollywood movies (Blade II, Hellboy), but a mere black-gloved sadist, even with an open gash on his cheek, has a hard time holding his own against an arboreal goat-god, an insectile pixie, a featureless humanoid with eyes in the palms of his hands, an obscene giant toad, a Tim Burton-esque airless sunless tangled landscape, and so forth. 2006.

The Pursuit of Happyness — The attainment of sappyness. A hand-to-mouth San Francisco salesman — of portable bone-density scanners, an unnecessary luxury item - lands an unsalaried competitive internship at Dean Witter, but not before his wife walks out on him and their five-year-old son ("Did Mom leave because of me?"). The star is the amiable Will Smith, but the director is Italian, Gabriele Muccino of The Last Kiss, which might inspire certain types of filmgoers to draw analogies to the Little Man humanism of De Sica and Company. The poignance, to be sure, is commensurately unrelenting (pushing through to schmaltziness), but the only real grit is in the graininess of the digital image. And the emotional payoff this isn't postwar Italy, after all - comes in the form of a cash jackpot. Jaden Christopher Syre Smith, Thandie Newton, Brian Howe, James Karen, Dan Castellaneta. 2006.

The Queen — A spot of simulated Rovals-watching, ably guided by the seasoned Stephen Frears: a satisfying, if unsurprising and unrevealing and unimaginative re-enactment of what must have gone on behind closed doors in the week after the death of Princess Di, in specific the diplomatic efforts of the newly elected Tony Blair to compel the Royal Family ("a bunch of freeloading, emotionally retarded nutters,' in the view of Mrs. Blair) to behave like human beings: "Will somebody please save these people from themselves?" Helen Mirren and Michael Sheen embody Her Majesty and the Prime Minister to two T's. In support of them, James Cromwell at least looks the part of Philip, but plays only one note, and Alex Jennings is a bit short in the snout (in complete contrast to Cromwell) but is otherwise credibly dyspeptic as Charles. The plentiful humor, out of deference to history and living persons, is very mild. 2006.

Rocky Balboa — The sixth installment in the *Rocky* series (despite the absence of a Roman numeral to remind us) comes thirty years after the first one and sixteen after the fifth. It will stand as a serviceable definition of "retarded." Written and directed by its sixty-year-old star, Sylvester Stallone, it wants nothing but to turn back the hands of time. Oh, Stallone may, in observance of auld lang syne, put his sanctified screen wife into the cold hard ground ("woman cancer"), and thus restrict Talia Shire, still listed in the credits, to youthful flashbacks. But what man, after all, with washboard abs and with veins bulging in his shoulders and biceps, could abide to be saddled with an old bag his own age? He can always get an evelift, dip into the hair dye, put on the same hat, run up the same steps to the same music, replace the old Ugly Duckling with a younger Ugly Duckling (Geraldine Hughes, no spring chicken, but nonetheless a quarter-century his junior), and if the script says so, if wishful thinking wishes it, he can still give as good as he gets in a risi-



ble "exhibition match" against the current undefeated, but unrespected, heavyweight champ (former light-heavyweight champ, Antonio Tarver). Skill vs. Will, it's billed as, and no chance to mistake which is which. By rights, of course, Stallone ought to have taken over the Burgess Meredith role and left the fighting to, say, Hilary Swank. The glaring irony of it is that, while the onscreen Stallone is supposed to be the personification of heart and desire, the offscreen Stallone can only have been motivated by the thing that motivates his on-screen opponent and supposed opposite: lust for a big payday. Rules of the Game — Jean Renoir's timely, finger-wagging comedy of manners about the French leisure class and its pastime pursuits, pre-WWI, offers a good deal more than the prologue promise of simple entertainment. It is more shrewdly conceived than normal for Renoir and more splendrously dressed and decorated. The acting, however, conforms to the customary, fey, hippity-hoppity gait, with Renoir himself, in the role of old-faithful Octave, setting the pace. The Science of Sleep — Michel

Gondry, the director of Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind and less memorably Human Nature, sets out to demonstrate he can be just as wacky and braintwisty without Charlie Kaufman as his scriptwriter, with, instead, only himself as scriptwriter. The blur of dream and reality demonstrates that, all right, but at a cost of increased tedium and irritation. (An unsteady handheld camera no doubt factors into the cost.) The dream scenes, incorporating a variety of animation techniques, are inventive, intelligent, informed, yet also invariably overstuffed, and not just in the literal sense of the stop-motion straw pony or the plump pillow typewriter. The wispy plot thread has to do with the amorous hankering of a graphic artist and crackpot inventor (mindreading helmets, time machine, and the like) for his next-door neighbor, a twosome seemingly made for each other: Stéphane and Stéphanie. Gael García Bernal and Charlotte Gainsbourg have little room to exert their charms. We know they have them. With Alain Chabat, Miou-Miou. 2006.

Smokin' Aces — Callous and smartypants action thriller in the Tarantino mode, or better, Tarantinissimo, revolving around a horde of free-lance bounty hunters and hit persons (a lavishly pierced and tattooed heavy-metal trio, a couple of black lesbians, a scar-faced master of disguise in Mission: Impossible latex, among others) in competition to cut out the heart of a Mob-connected Vegas headliner, Buddy "Aces" Israel, now under the safeguard of the feds. Writer and director Joe Carnahan, easing up on the heel-grinding naturalism of Narc, though not on the finger-snapping tempo, is serious only about that most frivolous thing, tricking the audience at the end, and about that most mindless thing, spraying the audience with bullets and blood. Venus — An abortive Pygmalion tale, written by Hanif Kureishi and directed by Roger Michell, about a septuagenarian one-

time matinee idol ("You're famous?" "A little bit") who takes an interest in the hopeless would-be model and, in the meantime ill-natured caregiver for her gay greatuncle, an old thespian crony of our Pygmalion figure. Some of the senescent sexuality has some interest in it for us, too, as we might expect from the indelicate writer of My Beautiful Laundrette, Sammy and Rosie Get Laid, My Son the Fanatic, and (also directed by Michell) The Mother. And yet, for all the outward thorniness, the film is a ball of mush at heart. Peter O'Toole, as the dried-up ham, gives a wearily bluffing performance that nevertheless seems to have won over the critics. Always prone to a heavy stress and a lurching cadence in his delivery of lines, a kind of vocal galumpher, he is now more ponderous and harderbreathing by half, going for the Henry Fonda Oscar — i.e., the sympathy vote and even, around the nipped-and-tucked hollowed-out eyes especially, looking a bit like late Fonda, a shadow of his former self (a "gorgeous" glamour shot from his salad days will remind us) or more accurately a cruel caricature of his former self. It is good to note that Vanessa Redgrave as his exwife continues to age beautifully, without taking extreme measures, and that she has still got a spark, a mere five years younger than O'Toole. Jodie Whittaker, in her screen debut as the Galatea figure, makes a pebble-sized splash, 2006. ★ (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

Volver — Almodóvar adds to his familiar sour comedy and mock melodrama the new element of an apparent apparition, a mundane ghost, a flatulent phantom, blended in with the familiar elements in uncertain tone. He shows nary a trace of the erstwhile "bad boy," nothing now but a good, good boy, devoted to mothers in particular, reverential of females in general, the Spanish George Cukor. (The cadaver in the freezer, male, is but a further sign of his respect and his awe.) The result can be recommended to the well-trained legions who are willing to meet this filmmaker seveneighths of the way. Even the foot-draggers must concede that it's deftly staged and well acted, and that Penélope Cruz, beyond acting well, shines like a star. Or more descriptively, a heavenly body. LEAD STORY

- Jennalee Ryan of San Antonio last year began selling choice human embryos, ready for prospective mothers to implant after having chosen from Ryan's catalog describing the contributors' education, attractiveness, and medical history. "We're just trying to help people have babies," she told the Washington Post in January, and at less cost than full in-vitro procedures (since she has eliminated the risk of failed fertilizations). But, said a bioethicist, "It's like you're ordering a computer from Dell." (Ryan said she does not take custom orders.) Of her emphasis on well-educated, good-looking contributors of sperm and eggs, she said, "Who wants an ugly, stupid kid?"

Chutzpah!

- After Emmalee Bauer, 25, was fired by the Sheraton hotel company in late 2006, she sought unemployment compensation from the Iowa agency that offers benefits to employees terminated through no fault of their own. However, the judge noted that Bauer had written a 300-page journal, during office hours, chronicling her efforts to avoid work. Among her entries: "This typing thing seems to be doing the trick. It just looks like I am hard at work on something very important," and, "Once lunch is over, I will come right back to writing to piddle away the rest of the afternoon," and, "Accomplishment is overrated, anyway." (Her claim was denied.)

Can't Possibly Be True

- We License Fishing, But We Can't License Parenting? (1) Shawn Mohan, 20, was arrested in January for shooting his infant son several times with a BB gun. Mohan said it was an accident, but the St. Charles County, Mo., sheriff pointed to similar bruises on the baby's face, left arm, hand, foot, hip, and buttocks, and said Mohan was on probation for an earlier childendangerment conviction. (2) Samaritans stopped on Interstate 465 in Indianapolis in December to help a wandering three-year-old boy wearing only a diaper and T-shirt. Police tracked down

his mother, Nancy Dyer, in her filthy apartment, where her two-year-old daughter was eating spaghetti off the floor. Dyer's first reaction to news about her son: "Oh, he got out again."

- For two months late last year, after a pair of convicted murderers escaped from Sudbury prison in England, the local Derbyshire police refused to release their pictures. According to the police, "Photographs of named people that are in police possession are classed as data, and their release is restricted by law" to instances where there is a "proper policing purpose." Derbyshire authorities said that since the escapees had probably left the area, there was no such purpose, and the photographs should be kept confidential.

Unclear on the Concept

- The school system in Hagerstown, Md., issued a written reprimand in December to the parents of a five-year-old kindergarten boy who had pinched a classmate's buttocks, terming his behavior "sexual" harassment. Said his dad: "He knows nothing about sex. There's no way to explain [to him] what he's been written up for." ... In December, the principal of a preschool in Bellmead, Texas, issued an in-school suspension to a four-yearold boy after he hugged his female teacher's aide with his face in her chest, which was termed 'sexual contact and/or sexual harassment" (though following complaints, the offense was changed to "inappropriate physical behavior").

The Continuing Crisis

- Daring young men use the danger of moving cars for attention, especially if there's a video camera rolling. An 18-year-old Topeka, Kan., man became the latest casualty when he bailed out of a car going 35 mph in October and suffered a serious head injury. Other video performers go "ghost riding the whip" (letting their cars coast in neutral while they climb onto the roof to dance), with at least two deaths reported. In the newest craze, Jonathas Mendonca, 22, was hospitalized in critical condition in Fort Lauderdale,

Fla., in January after "skiing" (holding onto the back of a car) on Interstate 95 at 65 mph.

In September, according to sheriff's officials in Buffalo, N.Y., Thomas Montgomery murdered a 22-year-old workplace colleague in a love triangle involving a West Virginia woman. Montgomery, age 47, was pretending to be a young Marine in online conversation with the woman, 45, who was pretending she was her 18year-old daughter. The murder victim had also struck up an online conversation with the woman, apparently making Montgomery jealous, but the victim, ironically, was the only one in the triangle who wasn't pretending to be someone else. - In January, a hospice in Britain run by Sister Frances Dominica approved the wish of a 22year-old man (born with Duchenne muscular dystrophy) who wanted to lose his virginity before he died. The Douglas House hospice arranged for a prostitute to visit him at his family's home, and the man said afterward, "It was not emotionally fulfilling, but the lady was very pleasant."

The District of Calamity

- The Washington Post, examining 135 cases of disability by "stress" among Washington, D.C., police officers, found only 16 that resulted from specific incidents, such as gunfire, with the rest due to "common workplace tensions" ("arguments with colleagues, shift changes, disciplinary actions" among them). According to an internal police memo, the department's generous disability benefit would be "unheard of in private industry and public service," and the department's rate of officers unable to work is, for example, several times higher than Baltimore's, according to the Post's October report.

(2) Mitchell Sigman, 22, was arrested and charged with robbing the Village Pantry in Elkhart, Ind., in November after the clerk-victim identified him as a regular customer and one who had recently filled out an application to work there. - Failures to Keep a Low Profile: (1) College student Cory Shapiro, 19, was arrested in January after he flagged down a police officer to complain that he had been overcharged for drinks at an Athens, Ga., bar. (2) Sunday-school teacher Edgar Selavka, 49, was arrested after he reported to police in Northampton, Mass., in January that someone had stolen his backpack from church; shortly afterward, police found the backpack in a nearby restroom, with its contents on the floor, including at least 11 child-pornography photos.





MEDICINE SOLDIER

THE LONG WAR

Times are frustrating. We are trying to work with the Iraqi people. My position affords me opportunities to see this on various levels. I often ride or walk through the streets in Iraq on patrol. I can feel the vibe in the city. There are days when it feels as if I'm joyriding, sightseeing, or parading down the streets. And there are days when the hair on the back of my neck crawls. On occasion, I attend meetings with Iraqi officers or people on the street with complaints.

Irag

Iraqi people have much fear and apprehension; there is a delicate balance of trust. The Marines and the Army have done damage in the cities we patrol, and our uniforms stand out. We are working with them, training them, giving them aid, handing out candy, toys, and toothbrushes for the kids. Under Saddam, the people knew what to expect. They feared him and knew the system was corrupt. Challenging the system got people shot or decapitated or their families hurt. Now soldiers in those same uniforms are trying to help them. The Iraqis have a newly elected government on top of old tribal customs, beliefs, politics, and corruption. The people do not know whom to trust, and my heart goes out to them. We rely on interpreters to accurately convey our thoughts and convictions. I watch as they talk, and I can see and feel their emotions, not knowing which way to turn. On the other hand, the terrorists wear no uniforms, change their tactics, and often work as sleepers to gain trust and access before committing to a suicide bomb.

I believe the Iraqis are good people and keep reminding myself how long it took the U.S. to become a united country.

I now appreciate how diverse Americans are and see the things we take for granted. The American army is, after all, a microcosm of America held to a tighter standard by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are here to provide a positive example for the Iraqis while respecting their beliefs. Doing so, we have given up more freedoms than being away from our families, and we live on cots in tents

We received more upgrades to our body armor. With my helmet, vest, and crotch protector, I feel as if I am wearing samurai armor. Survivability and mobility are inversely proportional — the more gear we put on, the less we can move, or want to move, in the heat. It takes time to break in and get used to before the gear becomes familiar and fluid. I think the tenets of Bushido have gone the way of the sword, more a decorative conversation piece than a warrior ethos.

There is a distinct difference between being a soldier and being a warrior. Although soldiering involves performing a job with a great deal of sacrifice, being a warrior really internalizes a commitment of mind, body, heart, and spirit. I don't think people understand why we are here or why we want to or should be here. It's not really for the combat patch, medals, oil, economy, et cetera. We hear there are



still people home protesting the war and voting at town meetings for us to come home. We are not fighting Iraqis. We are fighting corruption and fear. I have talked to several Iraqis in positions of authority. They all say the insurgents are either non-Iraqi Muslims who fear democracy and American influence and think our presence here weakens the Muslim/tribal culture, or they are people who were in Saddam's back pocket and are upset because they no longer have power and riches. The Iraqis seem to want us here to help rebuild and bring them out of poverty.

I wish the war protestors could see into the eyes of the children here. Sup-

port the troops by supporting these people. We are all related. I am an idealist, and I am here. I do not want to go home because of the way people feel back home. I am not giving up my seat so someone can die in my place. I am here to make a difference.

It may be to influence a handful of Iraqis and their children, so they do not grow up to hate Americans or become terrorists, or it may be to keep the guys in my unit alive. In any event, this is my path; I have to do the best I can.

Ann Coulter writes a weekly column, and in the course of her writing, I think maybe one in ten of her essays is worth excerpting from or commenting on. But, great googly-moogly if she didn't turn her 2006 book *Godless: The Church of Liberalism* into the equivalent of a home-run derby.

If you heard about the book at all, chances are that you're politically conservative, or you follow pop culture closely enough to remember that Coulter was harshly criticized for daring to suggest that four of the more outspoken and politically active widows of men killed in the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, were perhaps *enjoying* the celebrity bestowed on them by their husbands' deaths.

It's true that Coulter has never been known for her tact and also true that her writing shows an almost pathological preference for vinegar over honey. As a master of *ad hominem* and *ad feminam* zingers, the tall blonde dances (some might say slithers) between honesty and cruelty, while leaving the impression that this modus operandi is the predictable result of a smart woman's frustration with years of progressive doublespeak.

A-list operators like Dennis Kucinich and James Carville would probably forgive her insults, but bit players like Cindy Sheehan and Joe Wilson are less likely to. Odd, that, because being namechecked in a Coulter book ought to count as a feather in one's cap, even though most of her

namechecks have the force of a chaperoned trip to the boards in a professional hockey game.

This is not to say that Coulter's book is one long zingerfest. It will, I think, age better than most of its neighbors in the "Current


Events" section of your local bookstore. In that respect, it's as durable as the violin riff that bridges verses in the Crosby, Stills, and Nash song "Wasted on the Way," and the reason why is easy to discern: Apart from being frequently hilarious, *Godless* is also meticulously researched.

Here's a sample of Coulter's style from a chapter bemoaning the state of public education in America:

"When Jason Kamras received his National Teacher of the Year award from President Bush in 2005, he hailed the other members of his profession for working 'tirelessly every day doing wonderful and challenging work.' And he added that they 'do so almost always without recognition.' Without recognition? Kamras was in the Rose Garden of the White House being recognized by the president of the United States of America. I'm guessing they don't education." Coulter cites a fistful of movies and no less than eight different "Teacher of the Year" awards

teach irony at schools of



ranging from the National Football League to Wal-Mart by way of bolstering the following claim:

"Apart from Hollywood actors, teachers are the most incessantly praised profession in America. Run a Google search of 'Teacher of the Year' and you'll get almost 40 million hits — more even than 'Mother of the Year'!"

"Anyone can Google," you might say, and you'd have a point.

Coulter goes deeper, however, spelunking for shocking quotes like "Back in 1985, Albert Shanker, president of the American Federation of Teachers, said, 'When school children start paying union dues, that's when I'll start representing the interests of school children.'"

> Perhaps the most impressive part of the book — and where Coulter distinguishes herself from other conservative flamethrowers like Michael Savage — is in her four-chapter debunking of what Joseph Sobran calls "Darwiniac" orthodoxy. It's a *tour de force* compendium of logic ("however persuasive one finds the squirrel-fallingfrom-a-tree explanation for the evolution of the bat, there

are no fossils to support it,") and insult ("Evolution's Piltdown Man makes Scientology's 'e-meter' look like a particle accelerator at Los Alamos") arranged almost symphonically.

That the argument between the Darwinist and ID camps is essentially theological in spite of the Darwinian pretense of agnostic objectivity seems beyond dispute. I'd never thought of it that way before, but Coulter quotes Oxford zoologist Richard Dawkins, who let the cat out of the bag by saying that "Darwin made it possible to be an intellectually fulfilled atheist." Notwithstanding their advanced degrees, Dawkins and his ilk don't fare well under her withering assault.

Have you heard, for example, about the peppered moths that got darker in response to air pollution? I remember growing up with that British anecdote in high school biology textbooks. It was a fraud, Coulter reminds us, and not the first. Moreover, even if it had been true, it's hardly "the sort of metamorphosis that turns a mosquito into a German shepherd."

Lehigh University biochemist Michael Behe made essentially the same point in his groundbreaking 1996 book, Darwin's Black Box, but Coulter's Cliff Notes version is funnier. Worse (for the Darwiniacs), her attack can't be dismissed as superficial, because she uses everything from Chinese fossils to the Irish potato famine in making her point. Coulter is also adept at turning the tables on her adversaries, as when observing at the end of a chapter full of damning evidence that "far from chastely refusing to acknowledge miracles, evolutionists are the primary source of them."

In shooting terms, *Godless* is a bandolier full of hollow point rounds guaranteed to stop progressive intruders rash enough to attempt the invasion of any conservative mind. I've never read another book so widely denounced, and never found another book of that reputation that repaid my attention to the degree that this one does.

AS A CHILD, I TRAVELED WITH MY FAMILY ALONG THE DREARY ROAD from Budapest to Bucharest. We were the animal caretakers in the "Csodálatos Cirkusz" — the "Wonderful Circus." I was born into it, wagon wheels carrying me over loose stones and puddles.

Communism was hard on Hungary and Romania. Many snowy nights I slept on concrete, beneath the statues of Russian war heroes. My parents slept in line to buy bread and milk for my sister and me. In the morning, I would feed the tigers, bears, and hyenas what scraps I could collect from local butchers; sometimes only bones.

After several winters, the animals died. The checks from Mother Moscow slowly died. too. Cages emptied, steel bent, and wood splintered along the cracked and rocky road. The wagons were fixed, as best we could, and made into carts. The carts broke and were made into sleds to drag the old and sick performers through the weathered mountain passes.

A mime went to sleep and didn't wake up. In a note I found the next day, he declared that I should have his unicycle. From village to village I cycled, wobbly at first but steady over time. While on the unicycle, I carried a gypsy woman's sick dog, and while I did, she lent me face paint and a red-and-yellow cloak with fringe and tassels on its selvedge. In my outfit, and with my sick dog, I was the last "Csodálatos Bohóc," the last "Wonderful Clown."

My sister carried the heavy sign of our circus on her back. I carried the dog. The gypsy woman died. We had everything we needed. We propped the sign between the unicycle and a nearby rock for shelter. Village families gave us borscht and underwear. We paraded from capital to capital, the three of us - the dog, my sister, and me - a Wonderful Circus.

When I was 12 and my sister 10, a French woman in a white car stopped to pick us up. We left the sign, dog, and unicycle on the road that day, and we didn't stop driving until we were in Paris. In her flat, overlooking the river Seine, I saw a television for the first time.

Now I sit in front of my square cabinet of light, my own television, watching pictures of people laugh and dance, and I remember my unicycle and dog.



It has occurred to me that the publication date for this column is the day after Valentine's Day and what a shot for me. I'll say I forgot; just give me one more day. This year it will not only cost me zip, I'll call it work and it will actually make me a few bucks. I'll convince Mr. G., the art director, that this column requires an illustration of Willy Nelson playing pool with a bunch of dogs and a cute little bug, (private pillow talk imagery, no time to explain) scissor out the first couple of paragraphs and bingo! This thing will be too sensitive and thoughtful for words.

I've got a few books of poetry and about love to crib from:

> Oh twinkly bird of Love! Caress my tongue with words sublime To anoint my love, my valentine. Oh, throbbing manlove of destiny, Still thv ...

No, no. What is this? I wrote this on the inside flap of Listen to the Warm while I was waiting in line for Rod McKuen to sign it years ago.

Another book, The Four Loves, by C.S. Lewis, is a good bet. My Valentine (I will call her, as I often do, "the Bug") is Jewish, and Lewis would not be a major player on her bookshelves (though she has him, I believe). Bug is Jewish like I'm Catholic, which is to say we're not particularly vocal about it, and neither at least, rarely in public.

'We can sometimes point to the very day and hour when we fell in love or began a new friendship. I doubt if we ever catch Affection beginning. To become aware of it is to become aware that it has already been going on for some time Affection ... is the humblest love. It gives itself no airs." — The Four Loves

Oh twinkly bird of Love!

Lewis writes of Love in the forms of Friendship, Affection, Eros, and Charity. The first three are familiar, and the fourth gives pause. What does Charity have to do with the Valentine's Day, candy and flowers kind of love? My Valentine and I, having covered the first three aspects of Love as Lewis describes them, over a period of 23 years, find that Charity has inconspicuously made its way into the relationship. It was she, Bugspray, who introduced, with consistent charity to me and then to absolute strangers, this fourth aspect of love's evolution.

"Charity is a work so difficult that perhaps no fallen man has ever come within sight of doing it perfectly. Yet the law that loves must be transformed is, I suppose, inexorable.... The invitation to turn our natural loves into Charity is never lacking. It is provided by those frictions and frustrations that meet us in all of them; unmistakable evidence that (natural) love is not going to be 'enough' unmistakable, unless we are blinded by egotism. When we are, we use them absurdly."

In one sense, I suppose, Lewis is saying that every argument/fight/row is an opportunity. The Chinese have a single word, or character, for crisis and opportunity.

In a bizarre example of this, I can draw a line through Friendship, Affection, and Eros to Charity by citing an incident some ten years ago or so when, after spending a weekend with the Bug at her Bughouse (completely infested, she won't kill anything), we passed a familiar character on the streets of La Jolla. A homeless, schizophrenic transvestite known around the neighborhood had been mugged for his/her wig and My-Valentine-O'-Love suggested I buy her a new one. I did. Bug gave it to him. I have no idea if the poor soul ever wore it (the stolen one might have had personal, totemic significance); but the impulse, I maintain, is a weird form of what Lewis describes. Luckily Lewis is not around to come forward and say, "What are you talking about? What has that got to do with anything?" But I'm leaving it in here.

The Balboa Tennis Club in Morley Field is celebrating Valentine's Day with a poetry reading and casual get-together of as many as 1200 members with a suggested donation of five dollars to help supply "Waterman," or "Motown" David Ross with bottled water to distribute to the homeless in an area (skid row) where there are no water fountains and where dozens upon dozens of diabetic, schizophrenic, undernourished, dehydrated, displaced San Diegans go begging for a drink of water. Ross can no longer find the funds in his Social Security check to finance his rounds and indicated help from local companies like Pure-Flo never materialized. Regional manager Jeff Bickford of that company, for one, has not returned phone calls. Who wants to be "The Water of the Homeless!"? At any rate, Balboa Tennis Club has caught on to the spirit of Valentine's Day in a way C.S. Lewis would give the nod to. I hope they were able to get Ross some damned water, but if nothing else they should have demonstrated that, at least here, Love means something other than no score.



Another definition, however:

I remember, during puberty, seeing Richard Burton on (I believe) the Dick Cavett Show talking about Liz Taylor. Burton provided my first real definition of love, and it has held up better than most; it does right now. "Love," Burton intoned, "is tolerance to an irrational degree."

I do not love Saint Valentine's Day, and I still maintain that Al Capone was closer than anyone to celebrating it in the manner that it begs. But naturally that was wrong.

In closing, I will include those final lines from the young poet I once was, scribbling in a treasured volume on this moving holiday and in the throes of Eros.

How gay my bulging My yearning need For you, of thighs supreme I wandered lonely as a cloud Until you arrived upon the scene To lift me from the depths of gloom Loving only myself in my melancholy room.

Crude, unpolished, yes. But I think the romantic in me was more revealing than talented, and I had a certain something there.

My recommended reading for this year's Valentine's Day enthusiast, especially men, is Ladies' Man, by Richard Price. The author rivals Al Capone here in his grasp of the day's sentiment — only Price isn't wrong.


