When it rains A key lobbyist for the parent company of Student Loan Xpress, that controver-



sial student loan company founded by San Diegans Robert deRose and Fabrizio Balestri in 2002, used to work for GOP congressman Randy "Duke" Cunningham, now serving an eight-year federal prison term for bribery. According to a lobbyist registration statement filed

Randy Cunningham with the House of Representa-


tives, Education Lending Group, which recently merged with its subsidiary Student Loan Xpress, according to the company website, retained Erin Strawn and her firm, Stanton Park Group, in November 2005 to lobby for the "Re-Authorization of the Higher Education Act." Stanton Park was ultimately paid at least \$80,000 through 2006. Strawn's biography on the firm's website says she had been an "Appropriations Associate" in Cunningham's office. There



she "successfully shepherded" legislation "to allow certain student loan borrowers to

consolidate with their lender of choice" and "ran point for Cunningham's efforts to build coalition support for key programs in the Labor Health and Education bill."

Currently the nation's eighth-largest student-lending company, Student Loan Xpress, headquartered on High Bluff Drive in Del Mar Heights, grew rapidly, in part by plying university financial aid officers with advisory fees, free travel, and stock in the company. In one case, the company paid \$80,000 to send its executives to conferences run by a firm that was owned by a college's dean of financial aid. The alleged aim was to enhance loan referrals by the schools. DeRose, a former executive for American Express Educational Loans, and his associates



when CIT Group bought Student Loan Xpress for \$318 million. Last week, CIT put deRose and his associates, who continued to work for the company after its sale, on leave until investigations are complete. Those include one by Democratic senator

Besides employing Cunningham's ex-aide as a lobbyist, Education Lending Group created a political action committee that contributed \$5000 to "American Prosperity PAC" Cunningham's "leadership" PAC, in February 2005, as well as giving to other Republican causes. Company employees contributed \$10,000 to Cunningham's reelection campaign from 2003 through 2005.

Doctor Money When Dr. David A. Brenner was named vice chancellor and dean for the school of medicine at UCSD in February, his salary was the talk of the campus. Brenner, a gastroenterologist who came from New York's Columbia University, where he'd been chairman of the department of medicine, was lured out West by the heady pay of \$720,000 a year plus a \$125,000 relocation allowance and the chance to get a state-subsidized mortgage, up to \$1 million, in order to buy a suitable manse. Brenner's predecessor at the helm of the med school was Edward Holmes, who departed the campus last September for greener financial pastures in Singapore, where he and his wife, Judith Swain, a cellular cardiologist, joined that country's Agency for Science, Technology and Research. Holmes had been paid a relatively paltry \$531,277 a year, according to a May 2006 state audit. Sixty thousand of that came in the form of a controversial special side payment questioned by the auditors, who concluded that while not illegal, it "circumvented policy."

But if Holmes earned less than Brenner, he still seems to have done a good job of feathering his personal financial nest during his time at the university. According to a 14-page "leaving office" statement of economic interests that Holmes filed after he departed UCSD last October, he held stock in no fewer than 44 companies, including holdings valued at between \$100,000 and \$1 million in Tularik/Amgen Inc., which he said was a "Biotechnology/Big Pharma" company. Other medically related stocks in the Holmes portfolio included GlaxoSmithKline PLC-ADR; Interventional Rhythm Management; CR Bard Inc.; Johnson & Johnson;

Teva Pharmaceutical; and Varian Medical Systems.



In addition, his wife received between zero and \$499 for her service as a board member for Durham, North Carolina-based Synecor, whose website boasts, "We create paradigm-shifting

medical technologies." Holmes David Brenner was paid between \$1001 and

\$10,000 as an advisory board member for the London-based Wellcome Trust, which also paid more than \$24,000 for two trips he took to London in May and June. Other free trips he took included a four-day junket to Singapore last June, paid for by the National University of Singapore, valued at \$6193.28. The week after that, Glaxo-SmithKline reimbursed him \$6308.71 for travel expenses to attend the "RADEX Advisory Board meeting."

By comparison, Brenner's "assuming office" statement of economic interests, filed on March 26, is only four pages long and lists no assets at all, only relatively modest gifts and payments, including one speaking fee of between \$1001 and \$10,000, paid by Geneva, Switzerland-based pharmaceutical company Serono, and a second one of between \$500 and \$1000 paid by Celera, a San Francisco genetics company. He also lists travel reimbursements of \$2000 from Serono and \$1200 from Celera. Stuart Jamieson, UCSD's head of cardiothoracic surgery, gave Brenner theater tickets worth \$260. Jamieson had run the university medical center's controversial heart-transplant program, which was forced to suspend operations in February because it wasn't performing enough transplants to qualify for federal and state reimbursements from Medicare and Medi-Cal.



I assume we can use dollars from airports [budgets],"but that would reduce the City's airport capital improvement program, complained Waring.

Tenants Turn Up the Heat

n 2003, Bruce Francis was driving a taxi late into the night and sleeping daytimes at the Baltic Inn on Sixth Avenue downtown.

One day he lodged a complaint. "I told the managers, 'A lot of construction noise outside is keeping me awake, and by the way, it's awfully cold in my room in the early mornings.' " Management seemed responsive. They moved Francis across the street to the Simmons Hotel. (The hotels were owned by the same company.) But the room there was neither quieter nor warmer. After Francis complained again, management refused to accept his next rent payment. They wanted him to leave immediately.

"My friend Al DeBartolo said, 'Why don't you file a lawsuit against them? I'll help you,' "remembers Francis. He knew that DeBartolo, who is 79, often volunteered to help poor people fight legal battles. DeBartolo had owned several successful businesses in his earlier life, including a restaurant in Chicago and, during the 1970s, a riding sta-

me that old line about having a fool for a client." DeBartolo estimates that since then he has given assistance to 30 or more people in various legal struggles, claiming to have won about half the cases. He says he studied law for three years "a long time ago in San Francisco," but he can't remember the name of the school. He has not passed a bar exam in any state.

Bruce Francis took DeBartolo up on his offer and filed a class-action lawsuit, even though he was the only named plaintiff. With his friend's advice, Francis came before the court as a "plaintiff in proper." The term comes from the Latin "propria persona," or "on his own behalf." Judges do not like pro pers because they commonly lack knowledge of correct courtroom procedures and of how to write legal documents.

Before filing the lawsuit in 2004, Francis had called

says Francis. "Then, months later, in the middle of our lawsuit, they suddenly showed up. Shortly afterward workers started putting new heating equipment in the hotels."

From then on the hotels would have heat, but Francis was not satisfied. "Hundreds of people, maybe, had lived in those hotels without heat,"

judge dismissed the class action because we couldn't name all the parties to the suit." Francis ended up as a lone plaintiff and received a \$2500 settlement that he split with his advisor. "I told the judge," he says, "that I felt bad for Al [DeBartolo] because he put in probably \$20,000 in time, copying, and secretarial pay time working as a night clerk in the Reiss Hotel on First Avenue. On February 1, 2007, a night when the cold caused residents to complain more than usual, he fired off a letter to the hotel's owner, John Caparell. He asked for heat. "Also," he wrote, "please remove the wood shims [holding the windows open] in the bathrooms and please install windows in the shower rooms instead of these open holes in the upper walls." To use the common bathrooms and showers, residents have to walk down cold and drafty hallways. Francis tells me, "We had been told that when guests complain about heat, give them another blanket. Or tell them the building is too old for heat. Amazingly, that would work."

Francis was not anxious to get into another protracted fight, and he might not have written to Caparell except for one disturbing event. On January 23, after an especially cold night, Bryant Kemp, a man in his 60s who had a flulike illness, died in the hotel. Several other residents suffered from a similar illness at the same time. Nobody seems to know the exact causes of Kemp's death, but Francis emphasizes that being cold could not have helped him.

Caparell did not take the request for heat well. The day after receiving the letter, he came to the Reiss in the early morning. Caparell demanded to know why Francis couldn't have just called him. Why did he need to write a letter? On February 7 Caparell came back to the hotel. Sometime that same day, Caparell wrote Francis a "Notice of Termination of Employment for Cause." The cause cited was that once in January" you failed to properly fill out your cash reports as required." Caparell wrote that he then brought the failure to Francis's attention. "[Today], I again found your work documentation to be substandard...."

Francis insists there was nothing wrong with his cash reporting. And he says that Caparell has yet to put heat in the Reiss. According to Francis, the building doesn't have radiators, furnaces, or any other kind of heating mechanisms. Residents who try to use space heaters cause electrical shorts.

try. Collectively and individually we accept many risks in life and public policy. Yet in some areas we impose huge restrictions to protect against a very marginal risk." City employees overseeing airports had explained to him how landing patterns could be changed so that Sunroad wouldn't have to cut its building down to 160 feet. "The more I learn, the lower the event probability appears." Then he hedged, "Of course, the other side is that any acci-

dent would involve human life regardless of that probability."

Then Waring brought up what was really on his mind: land use, or real estate policies. "I do believe the reason the FAA is under increasing pressure to close airports all over America is because of issues and land use conflicts similar to this one.... I believe aviation function and safety can be preserved without the strait jacket the FAA imposes on local jurisdictions." The air-

port regulatory agency "will adapt to reasonable restrictions on use of land and money or it will in the coming decades see more and more airports closed." Land and money were critical, quoth he. "The cost of stopping [the Sunroad project] is extensive." The City had decided to permit Sunroad to complete the building's interior."It is their money they are risking by finishing the interior work," said Waring.

In late January of this year, representatives of the Development Services Department were to appear on a KPBS radio show. Waring looked over his employees' preparation sheets. "Remember, we do not believe the City has liability," he wrote emphatically.

Hmmm. Waring had told the California Department of Transportation on January 23 that"issues of lives and safety are not issues to be dealt with in terms of money."

On November 19, in still another letter, Waring opined that "overly restrictive FAA rules put unnecessary pressure on local jurisdictions and aviation resources.... Aviation safety and mission can coexist in many cases with general fund land uses." Then Waring returned to a monetary topic dear to his heart: economic development."The greater question is to what extent should an urbanizing community restrict economic development...to protect against a very low probability hazard? I'm not a pilot, but I have to guess that pilots are at much greater risk from our local mountains or from mechanical issues than they are at risk of hitting a building like the Sunroad one.... In a general sense, what economic opportunity loss should a city accept in support of an airport?" So, unlike what he asserted on January 23, public safety issues are definitely to be dealt with in terms of money, Waring said repeatedly.

In a letter to two city employees on December 4, Waring mused that he didn't know "whether the building is a real risk or whether this is much ado about nothing. Regardless, our job for the City of San Diego is to minimize any claims against the City, including trying to avoid a lawsuit against the City." Why not deter air accidents, rather than deter financial claims? One San Diegan, respond-

ing to Waring's doubts that low risk was worth \$45 million, put it straight to him: "You see \$45,000,000 and low risk. The FAA, Caltrans, and a bunch of airport users see yet another example of 'bend the rules to suit developers and city planners."

Waring's underlings were equally obsessed with the financial aspects of any attempt to make Sunroad comply with federal and state air safety laws. In October, the city attorney asked the City's Development Services Department to issue a stop-work order. "It will be very expensive to stop work," pointed out one employee in a note to Waring and Marcela Escobar-Eck, head of Development Services. "We are getting lots of pres-

On December 12, Waring exchanged ever-so-friendly emails with Tom Story, the longtime overseer of development activities for the City who went to Sunroad in late 2005 and is now being charged with influence-peddling by the city attorney's office. Waring was thinking of setting up a phone conference with the FAA. Story wanted to be in on the call. Story volunteered to have Sunroad's Washington lobbyjst set up the phone colloquy.

Sunroad has two even higher buildings on the drawing boards. Both of these, too, break FAA rules. On December 12, Waring offered Story gratuitous advice. "For what it is worth, I suggest you are making a tactical error in not solving building 1 and then and only then dealing with 2 and 3," offered Waring. Such chumminess.

While this was going on, Waring had his employees prepare a timeline. It shows that on June 19 of last year, the City learned that the FAA had concerns about the height of Centrum 1. The next day, the federal administration told Sunroad that the building would be officially classified as a hazard. Two days later, a Sunroad attorney said that the federal administration had no authority to control local land use. But the next day, June 23, Sunroad said it would hold

construction to 160 feet, as the federal government desired. On June 29, Sunroad got permission from the federal agency to construct the 160-foot building.

One month later, Sunroad told the City that it would build to 180 feet (now 190 feet). On January 23, Waring told the California Department of Transportation that "we have never received a satisfactory answer" why Sunroad agreed to build to 160 feet "and then proceeded to 180 feet."

The city attorney is trying to get an answer to that question in court. He is catching flak from the rest of city government. Could it have something to do with money?

idents. As a follow-up, Francis called on March 1. He tells me that Sheri Carr, the department's deputy director, promised to send someone out the next week. "Ten days later," says Francis, "I got a call from someone in the office of Marcela Escobar-Eck [director of San Diego's Development Services Department] telling me that Code Compliance had gone out to the Reiss in mid-February and found everything to be fine."

When I call, Sheri Carr first says that Code Compliance is not required to inspect hotels that were built prior to the enactment of San Diego's Uniform Building Code in





the 1920s. She estimates that the Reiss was built sometime around 1912. Nevertheless, Carr tells me, she went to the hotel in mid-February. "The owner showed me wall heaters in the rooms," she says.

"Maybe Caparell put on a dog and pony show for her," says Al DeBartolo. Recently, to get to the bottom of it, I went to the hotel and asked to see a vacant room I might rent. The room had a microwave oven and a minirefrigerator. But no heater or heating vent.

On April 9, with the help of Francis and DeBartolo, current Reiss Hotel resident Rita Curry filed a class-action lawsuit against John Caparell and his mother, Voula Caparell,

two known partners in a company called San Diego Progressive Urban Development. Ossie Coley and Peter Nadreau, former residents of the Reiss, are joining Curry in the action. This time DeBartolo and Francis want to make it impossible for the court to throw out the suit because it names an insufficient number of plaintiffs. The suit alleges that company owners illegally and "intentionally withheld...heat from all guests and tenants of the Reiss Hotel for a period of at least four years...." In addition, it charges that they "routinely refuse and threaten to refuse rent payments from tenants, who are otherwise current on their rent, for the primary purpose of depriving these tenants of the full rights of tenancy, specifically the tenants' rights to challenge the evictions in court." The plaintiffs are asking the court to award them attorney fees and damages for all people who have lived at the Reiss over the past four years.

By phone John Caparell tells me that Francis "has done this kind of thing before. It's basically extortion," he says, by which he means "the use of unmerited threats to obtain money." I ask Caparell, who is an attorney, whether his hotel has heat. "I don't comment on matters that are currently being litigated," he says.

The day after Francis served Caparell notice of the lawsuit, Rita Curry tells me, she had her rent payment rejected. She was being evicted. "The manager told me, 'John [Caparell] is not happy with you," says Curry. "But it was cold here this winter. I asked for another blanket, but they said they couldn't give me one." When Curry told Reiss manager Art Mendoza that she had a legal right to stay, he called the police. He convinced them that hotels are permitted to refuse future business with their guests. The police then gave Curry an hour to pack her things and leave.

But Curry called Francis, who called police headquarters. "I told the officer in charge that Mendoza had hoodwinked her officers," he says. "Once tenants have rented rooms for 31 days or more, they have the same rights as any regular renter. They have the right to challenge their eviction in court. And I told the officer I didn't want to see the City charged in the lawsuit too." Within the hour, he claims, the police came back and told Curry she had the right to stay.


I speak with the two other plaintiffs as well. Peter Nadreau lived at the Reiss during December and January, when he had a job. He tells me that he is among a group of elderly and occasionally homeless people who, depending on their income, go in and out of residential hotels. "If people start getting something like [federally funded Supplemental Security Income], they can stay indefinitely," he says. Not long ago Nadreau quit his job and now sleeps in a friend's storage facility.

Ossie Coley came to San Diego from Northern California last summer. Before that he lived in Washington, D.C., where he participated in another lawsuit over lack of hotel heat. "The Georgetown University Law Center helped us with that one," he says. "The hotel got hit with 30 different violations." Coley now has a new job and has rented an apartment.

"Wasn't it," I ask, "a lot colder in Washington?"

"Oh, yes," says Coley. "But it was tremendously cold in the Reiss this past winter." ■

Trump Sneaks Into PB?

I read with interest Don

Bauder's article ("U-T and Police Lie About Aguirre," "City Lights") in the April 5 issue of the Reader about what he aptly calls the Incest Perpetuation League (IPL). 

From: Loser, posted to M.A. Comments board: you guys have no information on how water finds its own level PLEASE GET SOME IT'S FOR MY SCIENCE EXPERIMENT

Googling has now officially replaced thinking. A student is simply the passive device through which a teacher's question is transmitted to the Internet, where an answer magically appears. And heck, I didn't do my own homework in school. Not going to start now doing other people's. But thank you for asking and for saying "please" to a disembodied etherbeing who doesn't even have the power to send you to your room without dessert for not saying "please."

So, okay, you want your basic physics experiment that will be eye-catching yet scientifically relevant. For that you'll need a garden hose, a clarinet, a big cannoli shell (unstuffed), a five-inch PVC sewer pipe, ziti (uncooked, no sauce), a megaphone, bagpipes, a flute, and a large glass globe with a hole in the top and bottom. Stretch the garden hose straight and horizontal, close off the ends, and punch enough holes in it to stick each of the other objects into it perpendicularly — so water will flow through the hose and in and out of the bottom of the bagpipes, the ziti, etc. Now take a big bunch of water and pour it into, oh, maybe, the glass globe. It doesn't really matter. Start with the clarinet, if that suits you. After you've poured in what you figure is "enough" water, stand back and look at your experimental array. Take our word for it (since I guess you can't really see the water level in any but the glass), the water in each of the things stuck in the garden hose is at the same level as in each of the others. Straight as an arrow, an equal distance above the garden hose. The water's no higher in the sewer pipe than it is in the cannoli. Water has sought its own level and you've proved it. This works because gravity never sleeps, and because no matter the size or shape of the thing sticking out of the garden hose, the pressure of the water at any given point on the side of the thing will remain equal. Pour more water into the clarinet, and the level will change in all other things to come back into balance. You've also just shown that water will flow uphill inside a bagpipe if conditions are right.

Hello, Matt:

Each 12-ounce beer bottle says "10 cent CRV refund." When I took about 200 saved-up bottles to a recycle place, to my surprise, they did not count the bottles, just dumped them in a container to be weighed. When I was shown the refund and questioned it, they said it was, like, 10 cents a pound. The 10 cent CRV printed on the label can be deceiving. You naturally think, "Wow, I am getting back 10 cents. I better drink more!" I did the same thing at the local Albertsons shopping-center recycling place. I was given 5 cents CRV per bottle. This is confusing. In fact, that is when I later took the bottles to the recycle center, thinking I would get 10 cents instead of 5 cents per bottle. So, you are saying that the 10 cents per bottle CRV on the label means 10 cents per pound?

Zowie! Surprised you could find the recycle center after 200 beers. But that was your big mistake. You are due 5 or 10 cents back, depending on the size of the bottles (5 cents for less than 24 ounces, 10 cents for the larger ones) only if you bring in fewer than 50 at a time. Fewer than 50, the recycler folks count 'em out and pay you accordingly. More than 50, the law sez they can pay you by weight. The weight value isn't based on the CRV but on the market price for old beer bottles. Same applies to cans. So, see if you can get yourself up and out of the house every 49 beers or so to get your full recycle fee back.

In August '06, I received a birthday card that sang to me "The Age of Aquarius" by the Fifth Dimension. The dang thing's still singing. Since then I've talked to friends whose singing cards have lasted three years. What powers these things, nuclear energy?

Scary little critters, those cards. Do kind of have a life of their own. They're powered by teensy three-volt lithium ion batteries stuck away in the fold of the card, along with the analog recording chip, amplifier, and flyspeck speakers. The whole Rube Goldberg device is activated when you open the card. When the card's closed, a tab slides between two contacts. When opened, the tab slides away and the juice flows. Since the device is analog, not digital, it draws very little power, so you might have to beat it to death with a stick when you just can't stand it anymore.

used to travel half the year. Many trips were to oddball places, so I flew on oddball airlines. As a consequence, although I have pro-league air miles on my scorecard, the total is diluted because my frequent-flyer miles are split between seven airlines.

One of my big accounts was with U.S. Airways, which, after bankruptcy, after shoving their pension obligations off to the federal government, announced that if I — and this goes for everyone else in my affinity cohort — did not fly on one of their wretched airplanes within the next 18 months, they would void my frequent-flyer miles.

This only reinforced my view that airplanes are for long-distance travel only. The hassle of getting to and being in an airport, the overbooked flights, lost luggage, laughable ontime records, prison food, all of it served up by workers who are paid too little and have too much power — a toxic combination that causes them to hate their customers — means I'll drive or take the train for any trip less than 600 miles.

A few months after my airline's extortion announcement, there came to my attention, by way of United States commercial mail, an offer to trade my airline miles for magazines.

Suddenly, I realized I had no idea what was going on in magazine world. After all, I'm vaguely connected to magazine world in the sense that I write and magazine writers write too. I really should know a little more about what my brothers and sisters do over there on the magazine side of the planet, so, on the spot, I decided to hoist the flag and acquire magazines. Actually, I could use an update. Other than the *New Yorker*, my magazine reading has been zero since the Internet came to town.

So, with a feeling of righteousness and of doing good works, I made my way down the list of magazines and checked the box next to: Esquire, Maxim, Backpacker, Newsweek, Jet, Vanity Fair, Guns & Ammo, The Economist, Lucky, ESPN, Interview, Aquarium Fish Magazine, Harpers Bazaar, Log Homes Illustrated, Swap Meet Magazine, and for the hell of it, a daily subscription to Variety, which, I note, goes for \$300 a year.

Fuck you, U.S. Airways.

Six weeks later, like stragglers trying to catch up to a defeated army, my subscriptions began to arrive. In that same way, when you go back to a place you lived 20 years ago and see with new eyes all the changes that have taken place, changes that people living there now don't notice, I saw magazines as they were and as they are now.

A champion of the form is Maxim, which appears to have taken a stand that they don't need editorial; they're going to fill their pages with glossy ads, period. You have to admire that. And, of course, there's the always reliable Guns and Ammo. I simply picked up where I left off.

The rest took space in my mailbox. I glanced at their covers on the way to the dumpster, save for one... *Variety*. I found sports news there that I didn't see anywhere else.

A while back I wrote a column about unknown sports leagues. One was the USA Rock Paper Scissors League. It was a joke — I mean, the league was real, but it was a joke in context of what people think of when they think of professional athletic leagues. I put this league as one step above betting on which of two chickens will lay the first egg.

"I've been to some places that consider themselves liberal and accepting," said one congregant at St. John the Beloved. Those qualities were important to him because he was both gay and divorced. "But

for them, 'liberal and accepting' meant the priest was in a Hawaiian shirt and there was dancing on the altar."

Not here. Here, the theology would allow for both gay and female clergy, but there would be no priests in Hawaiian shirts. The setting was humble: a small, octagonal chapel at University Christian Church ("examples of true, radical hospitality," said Rector Thomas Beckman). Two small stained-glass windows, depicting what might have been smoke and flame, joined a cross, a midcentury portrait of Jesus, and a Monet landscape as the room's principal adornment. But other elements seemed more ornate and more typically (even traditionally) Catholic. The embroidered trim on the altar cloth, matching both the tapestry surrounding the cross on the wall and the detail work on Father

Martin de Porres Griffin's vestments. Two pots of Easter lilies, placed beside two tall candlesticks before the altar. Just off to the left, a silver crucifix on a pole. A modest brass tabernacle, huddled in a corner beside a richly detailed Paschal candle. And when the acolytes entered the church during the entrance hymn, they wore black cassocks covered by white albs. "Christ the Lord is risen today, Alleluia/ All on earth with angels say, Alleluia."

More traditional gestures permeated the Mass: the priest slowly bowed his head when he mentioned Jesus' name in prayer. A snippet of Latin opened the Gloria, and the congregation intoned the Our Father. One congregant made the sign of the cross at the phrase Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" in the Sanctus, another knelt at the elevation of the Eucharist. In general, Griffin's words and motions seemed careful and deliberate - not formal to the point of seeming mannered, but not casual, or even ordinary.

Still, it wasn't all old-school Catholicism. Of necessity, piano took the place of an organ,

and the arrangements for the liturgical music had a modern, folksy feel. The sign of peace enjoyed a privileged status: nearly everybody wished the peace of Christ to nearly everybody else, often through an embrace instead of the more typical handshake. And there were two noticeable variations from standard Catholic liturgy: "For us and our salvation" replaced "For us men and our salvation" in the Creed, and the Eucharistic prayer did not include a prayer for the pope. The Gospel told the story of Jesus visit-

ing the disciples after His resurrection, appearing in their midst even though "the doors were locked," and saying "Peace be with you." In his homily, Griffin said, "Many times, the doors of our hearts are locked, but Jesus enters anyway, and He says, 'Peace be with you.' He breathed on them His holy spirit, and...there is safety in that place. The disciples feel safe in the care and the presence of Jesus."

Why is it that every time I use this jigsaw, the blade breaks right before I finish the project?" complained my father. My parents were visiting and Dad was spending a lot of time in the garage creating wooden toys for our kids. My hubby Patrick was a bit embarrassed. Dad knows how to use a jigsaw, so Patrick knew that the **\$30**

BestBuys

Black and Decker jigsaw he bought ten years ago was probably to blame. "Every year," he told me after my parents had flown home, "I'm embarrassed by the cheapness of my jigsaw when your dad comes here. When I

bought that thing, I went for the bottom of the line. But I can't seem to make a straight cut with it. I thought since I wasn't going to use it very often, I didn't need to buy a durable, contractorgrade saw. But maybe there is more to it than durability."

I decided to research and buy a quality jigsaw to spare my hubby more embarrassment and to relieve Dad's blade-breaking frustration. I spoke with a salesman at White Cap tool store to get some hints on what to buy. "You get what you pay for in any power tool that you buy," he explained. "If you buy an off-brand jigsaw, it is not going to perform as well. The tools we sell here are more for the contractor, the guys that are going to be depending on them to make money.

How much should you expect to pay? "I would say between **\$150** and **\$200**," he said. "I wouldn't spend more than \$200 if you are a homeowner. First, you want to look at how often you are going to be using the saw; what you are doing with it, how well you want your product to turn out, and how dependable you want it to be. If you are going to use it one time and probably never again, save yourself some money, go with a less expensive one. But if you will be using the tool for a hobby, buy a really good saw, buy dependability."

White Cap sells Bosch and DeWalt jigsaws. "With any tool there are

going to be little characteristics for each one," he said. "Some highlights of the Bosch are one-touch blade change. You use one hand to get the blade into it, so it is really simple. The bevel, which

is the plate on the bottom, is real easy to adjust, so you can adjust the angle that you are cutting. Some of the saws have dials for the trigger so that you can dial in your speed; you can set an adjustable speed.

"There are top-handled jigsaws and there are also fine-cut power hand saws, which are similar," he continued. "There are different SPMs, strokes-per-minute. There is one that has a five-amp motor, and it is a variable speed from 500 SPM to 3100 SPM. Having the variable speed is important so that you can fine-guide yourself around the material. using a jigsaw, you are cutting designs. So having that maneuverability, that variable speed, is very important with a jigsaw. Most jigsaws are from 500 to 3100 [SPM]. There is also different amperage for the different saws. Some saws have 5 amps, others 6.4 amps. More amps mean more power."

Patrick's old Black and Decker jigsaw is 2.5 amps. My man deserves more power. But the White Cap salesman, who asked not to be named, explained that there's more to look for than power. "When you are working with jigsaws, what wears out is the blade. So you want to be able to change the blade easily."

Patrick has to use a screwdriver to replace the blade on his jigsaw — always a source of grumbling (or worse), especially if he and the saw are at one end of

the house and the screwdriver is in the garage at the other end.

"Also," the salesman continued, "You have to use the proper blade. Don't use a woodcutting blade to cut metal. Bosch sells a set of five blades for \$17, contractor-grade, for metal and wood with "L"."

nails."

What size boards can you cut with a jigsaw? I asked him. "It depends on what kind of blade," he replied. "Cutting capacity for aluminum is three-quarters of an inch thick. Plastics you can go an inch and a quarter; steel, threeeighths; stainless steel, one-eighth of an inch; and the cutting capacity for wood is three and three-eighths inches."

I've seen both Patrick and Dad get frustrated with tangled extension cords. I asked the salesman if White Cap sells any cordless jigsaws and if he'd recommend them.

"We sell a DeWalt cordless jigsaw (\$121)," he answered. "It is a little bit more compact and easier to use. It has 5.5 amps, so it is going to give you a lot of power. But, for use around the house, normally you have access to power, and it is not a big hassle to plug one in. You can set up in your garage or home shop and use a powered [corded] saw."

That night, I told Patrick I wanted him to buy himself a new jigsaw on me. I gave him all the information the White Cap man gave me, and I expected him to spend around **\$150**. He came home from Home Depot with a Ryobi jigsaw, which he described as not contractor-grade, but good do-it-yourself quality. The 5.5-amp saw featured a laser guide and a quick-release blade change for **\$69**.

"Mom, I told you she was 'proper' and 'elegant'; that doesn't mean 'tight-lipped' and 'cold," I replied.



"That's right," Dad answered in kind. "I get no respect." Despite their Statler and Waldorf routine, the men obediently rose to their feet and walked to the table.




RED CARPET STAPLES:



The creator of several custom smoothies, Coggan has expanded his dessert counter, which at one time offered the standard fare of Rice Krispie treats and chocolate chip cookies but now includes a selection of decadent desserts. There is the aforementioned Chocolate Bomb, popular with the Cream staff, a smooth, rich mousse

The fruit tart, a hearty slab of crust, custard, and glazed strawberries, kiwi slices, and blueberries, is Coggan's personal treat of choice. He's also incorporated a selection of chocolate truffles, brownies, and bars made by local chocolatier Eclipse. Eclipse taps into the more serious side of chocolate. Some of the "infusions" are adventurous, like the peppered fig and goat cheese (and the poppy seed and anise) truffles. Some are definitely not for the faint of palate; one of the brownies includes, along with a milder hazelnut flavor, a startling hit of chili.

Coffee is still the main focus. There's Guatemalan, French, Hawaiian hazelnut, and a host of others, depending on the day. Coggan orders exclusively from

and Coffee Au Lait (coffee with steamed milk). It's no wonder that "Cream" is actually an acronym, from the illustrious statement "Coffee **Rules** Everything Around Me," a title Coggan stole (and adapted) from the Wu-Tang Clan song "Cash Rules Everything Around Me." This is not without irony; when Coggan first got the idea for his business, the coffee aspect wasn't even a consideration. His intention was only to lease a small space behind Cream for his clothing store, Neighbourhood, which he runs with business partner Christine McLaughlin. Around the corner from Cream, Neighbourhood is stocked half with vintage items, half with smalllabel, small-batch brands. Rhinestonestudded, ruby-red slipon flats mingle with hand-screened hoodies; limited-edition jewelry and military-styled caps hang from carefully dressed mannequins. Neighbourhood was the intention all along; Cream was a happy accident gone wild. "I had to buy this business in order to ensure that my sublease would be recognized by whomever was going to buy the building," Coggan explains, "[and] because the owner had to sell, he could have sold to somebody who would have kicked my ass right out. So, I basically had to take out a big second on my house and buy a coffeehouse."

With his soul patch beard and stylishly bedheaded hairdo, Coggan looks more like your older brother's cool friend than a business owner. He's energetic and friendly and knows many of his regular customers by name. So does his staff, an eclectic bunch of young men and women who have all the hipness — edgy haircuts, funky clothes, discriminating musical tastes — associated with baristas but none of the pretense. The clientele has responded; while a few know Coggan and company from their pre-Cream days, many regulars have befriended them through the new shop.

Before starting his clothing-and-coffee business, Coggan was exclusively an artist and designer. He has a background in both graffiti art and more "tradi-

tional" logo branding, experience he used to create his own design firm, Coggan Creative. The tailoring of Cream evokes the spark of the street and the tempered sleekness of a creative, communal working space. Part of this is due to the building itself, which has a mid-'70s look, but Coggan is largely responsible for a complete renovation and redecoration. The result runs an interesting gamut between warehouse chic and neo–art deco, with ergonomic (and surprisingly comfortable), minimalistinspired furniture, exposed-beam ceilings, and a sheer vastness. The back wall features an abstract, pastel-colored

mural of overlapping, oval-ended lines painted by Coggan himself — while the front of the store is dominated by plate-glass windows that overlook Park Boulevard. Coggan's graffiti influence isn't lost either; on the building's sides are two massive spray-paint pieces of voluptuous women amid a swirl of abstractions, both courtesy of Coggan's network of graffiti writers, known collectively as "MSK." The two murals were painted by crew members Mac and Retna, who worked by streetlight as a gathering crowd looked on.

For Coggan, it all comes back to art. "Just the process of building [Cream] is almost a performance art, you know what I mean?" he says, then laughs. "And it's an expensive performance, let me tell you. But it's an enjoyable one." *Recommended:* H-Bomb Smoothie: tastes like a liquid muffin; Red Rooibos Tea: full of antioxidants, this stuff kept a bad cold at bay. Eclipse Orange Macadamia Nut Truffle: melts in your mouth, not in your hand.

Dirtbag started in 1996 from modest beginnings — "two shirts, a paper bag, and some crappy Kinko's cards," says Alves — and slowly grew into a business. It began in San Francisco, when Alves bought the original "Dirtbag shirt" from his college buddy and Dirtbag co-founder Doug. It's a simple design, the word "Dirtbag" printed across a yellow oval, but managed to get the two friends a lot of attention. "Everywhere I went, people were, like, 'Dude, Dirtbag, that's cool!'" says Alves. For a while, the idea lay dormant, until Alves and Doug, in a stroke of luck, became roommates. Alves offered up his own savings, and with that seed money, the two jumpstarted the company.

Through word of mouth, help from pals and family, and maxedout credit cards, Dirtbag began to grow, enough so that by 2000, both Doug and Alves quit their jobs and dedicated their days to the business. "We started hooking up with a lot of bands, which are all over, you know, Slipknot, Shadows Fall.... We've worked with Dimebag, with Damage Plan.... They just love Dirtbag," says Alves. "It's a slow way to build a business, but in reality, it's probably better off because our foundation's so strong right now. It's a



personal friendship with half the bands."

The Dirtbag store, on Garnet Avenue in Pacific Beach, reflects the rock aesthetic. Stage lights hung from the ceiling showcase the clothes. In one corner, on a riser covered in corrugated steel, is a full drum set, behind which sits a bank of TVs three screens wide. Beside that is a full rack of limitededition guitars made by a company called Boogie Street. Music, as Alves maintains, is central; every available inch of wall is covered with signed band posters. Thrashed cymbals and drumheads are mounted above the wall of TVs like art pieces, unreadable signatures splashed across them.

They've come a long way since the yellowoval days. Discarding that lackadaisical handwritten logo, the first line of Dirtbag shirts began with an edgier

emblem, a blocky redand-white "Dirtbag" done in a modernized Old English font and flanked by a pair of stars. This went on everything from tank tops to windbreakers to hats to wristbands and helped solidify the idea of Dirtbag as a rock-and-roll enterprise. The next shirt was a flaming skull and crossbones, also black and red. Lately, however, Dirtbag has expanded to include ornate images and multilayered designs. Winged skulls sit against a backdrop of faded lightning bolts, all printed atop a background of white. An animal skull (indexed on the Dirtbag website as the "Demonic Goat") bears the initials "DB" across the bridge of its nose, red swirls curling out from its center. Calligraphic flourishes edge the classic Dirtbag logo, dripping white paint (or blood?) down the torso of a long-sleeved

thermal.

There are now Dirtbag handbags, chic "hobo"-style clutch purses that come in vinyl, velvet, and canvas and are priced modestly at \$25 apiece. There are also new Dirtbag hats, some modeled after military-style duckbills, others more outlandish, such as their British cabbie-style caps. This new fare features the newer Dirtbag look, with winged fleur-de-lis, embossed skulls, and Gothic print patterns. It's still Dirtbag only...fancier.

"We've had grandparents 70, 80, 90 years old wearin' it," says Alves, who points out that their spokesmodel is a grandmother in her late 90s. She beckons from a nearby poster, where she sits in a lawn chair, decked out in a Dirtbag shirt and sunglasses, raising a martini aloft. "One guy might be a skater, one guy might

Fractalize sells not the traditional glass pipeand-gag-shirt wares Ocean Beach has become famous for, but items geared to a slightly different crowd. Deepbeat music booms from unseen speakers: Thievery Corporation, Soul Coughing, hip-hop, reggae. Psychedelic poster art is on prominent dis-

play. A glass case boasts a collection of gems, uncut emeralds, and local abalone chips. Yes, hoodies and T-shirts line the back wall, but with a spin. Silhouetted birds fly up the arms of a



sweatshirt; a mandalalike sun design blooms on a brown thermal. Something is going on.

"We focus on independent West Coast lines," co-owner Ryan Potter explains. "Conscious clothing is the main thing all our items have in common, clothing that is made of environmentally sustainable materials, hemp, bamboo, and organic cotton, and clothing made out of recycled plastic."

Potter gives a quick tour, running through the brands. There's Evolve Universal, which has a dreamy, illustrative style, and Dope Logo, a company that "hides" a

420 symbol (used by stoners as slang for pot) in each of its graphics -"subliminal living," as Potter says. There's Creation Skateboards, whose merchandise reflects a Rastafarian slant both in its color scheme and lion-centric images, and the Satori Movement, which mod-

els its logo after Tibetan calligraphy. Both are brands that use what Potter refers to as "sustainable materials," bamboo, which makes a heavier fabric, like silk, and that old standby, hemp, which is tightly woven, thick under the fingers. Recycled plastic becomes fleece, soft and buttery. Some companies have a nature theme - birds, butterflies, vinelike designs while others have a more hip-hop, graffiti-centric aesthetic, with funky letter-styles. Still others tackle the music world, weaving microphones and headphones into their logo designs and depicting dreadlocked DJs spinning records with caricatured fingers. On the back wall is a special line that screens '70s-style art directly onto the garments, all rendered in eve-popping colors. There's also the house brand, Off the Grid, started by Potter and co-owner Mac Briggs. Their mission is sustainable living, an idea hammered home by

one of their first logos, a series of modernized windmills.

Potter makes intricately sewn patchwork corduroy pants and skirts hung on individual racks throughout the store. Before opening Fractalize, she traveled from music festival to music festival, following bands like Widespread Panic, moe., and Phish — though she is, by her own account, more of a Deadhead. The business is a collaboration between herself and Briggs, who also happens to be her husband. "It had always been a dream of both of ours, and so we made it happen," says Potter. "Being down here, we just kind of jumped on the opportunity. This is such an ideal location, with street traffic and everything, that the moment we saw a forlease sign, we jumped on it and made it happen. So it's definitely a dream come true."

Future of Style is the anti-mall. Run by husband-and-wife team Dimas and Erika De La Cruz, the store is stocked exclusively with limitededition, limited-run, indie designer stuff, from shirts to shoes. There are one-off jewelry pieces, belt buckles, and hats. Oh, and those shoes. They sit, high-tops and low-tops both, on a shelf of their own, as wildly colored and patterned as Easter eggs. "Right now, there's a really big resurgence [of shoe collecting] that actually started back in the late '70s but has become a really big phenomenon." Dimas points out a pair of orange-and- purple lowtops dotted with little skulls: "Day of the Dead shoes," he says, a theme both he and his wife have a personal connection to. "The thing about these shoes is that companies like Nike and

Adidas are creating limited-edition shoes done in small quantities, and lots of times they've collaborated with certain famous artists, and they release these shoes to special boutiques."

It's not just the shoes that are special. Each Tshirt here is a work of art, some designs ethereal, others emulating old punk posters, with raw splashes of color and rough, ridged lines. Some incorporate hiphop celebrities into their motifs: Temple Effectives has rapper Notorious B.I.G. (or "Biggie") on one of its shirts, a caricature of his face silhouetted in white against a graffiti-style burst of gray bubbles. Spoonfed, another brand sold at Future of Design, puts a hibiscus-flower-andhand-grenade "lei" pattern around the shoulders of one shirt, with the words "Charlie don't surf!" in the middle.

None of the merchandise is without flourish, in great contrast to the store itself. Most of the space is pure that makes it easy to take in all the colors and patterns of the wares. Everything is within reach, and very little is locked up behind glass — and even these pieces feel accessible, well lit and well displayed within their cases. The store is expanding; once the small shop in the back of a larger downtown establishment, it's moving into the now-vacant front section — a departure from the company's first incarnation as an Internet business started up in 2003. "We actually kind of went backwards, because most companies



start brick-and-mortar and then open up an Internet business," Dimas laughs. "But we were an Internet business that became a brick-and-mortar." The plan is for more clothes, more brands, more music, and of course, more shoes.

The clientele evokes "hipster with disposable income"; anyone else would have trouble affording the rarer clothing items Future of Style sells. "We basically cater to people that are looking for limited-edition graphic-design clothing, T-shirts and jackets that are done in limited quantities and are also kind of unique collectors' items as well," Dimas says. "All our T-

shirts have that aesthetic. You can't find them at malls or large department stores, and so it encompasses that whole street movement that's going on right now."

The street movement he speaks of isn't easy to pin down, and that is exactly the point: lines are crossed, messages mixed. Everyone gets in on the action. "Hip-hop was started in the early '80s, so it's already gone beyond a 20-year-old type of culture," Dimas explains. "Now you have your 35, and people pushing close to 40, and Generation X, and even Generation Y kind of all sharing the same enthusiasm for this type of culture." Future of Style will

be changing constantly, and the De La Cruzes are ready for it. Street culture is evolutionary. "It's very universal now," Dimas says. "You can't look at a person and say that they're hip-hop now. 'Cause they can look like a punk-rock person and like hiphop..." This, in his eyes, is a positive. "There's a really big crossover right now," he says, "and I'm interested to see where it's going to take us."

Blondstone owner Heidi Holman has a different kind of office accessory: a blowtorch. Ensconced in her brightly lit La Jolla headquarters, she rules her roost quietly from her workstation at the back of the store, head just visible over her desk. Holman has chosen to work in plain view, setting and soldering and stamping and cutting, set back from the action of the shop but still near enough to take part. Behind her, her apprentice, Anne, is busy fitting silver wire around pieces of glass. Both workstations are neat, in keeping with the light, airy theme of the store, and offer customers and visitors a direct look at the process. A certain friendliness arises, the antithesis of artistic pretense.

Holman's signature is a piece known as the "Wave," a cut shell that forms a cresting swirl at its center. The sliced shell used is astonishing in its perfection and intricacy; it's hard to believe it was, before Holman cut it, formed naturally. Holman puts the Wave in rings, necklaces, and bracelets, but it is at its most beautiful on its own, hanging as a pendant from a leather cord or silver chain, delicate but solid. "That one took me months to figure out," she says, "just to bring something new, because seashells in sterling became popular in

the import industry, so my things weren't as unique. We've been doing the Wave for about three and a half, four years, and it got very popular. So I'm proud of that."

She also loves to set sea glass, something that flies off the shelves. She'll put it in rings, edging the silver around the glass with little flourishes kept simple enough for the beauty of the glass to shine through, and in rows of threes and fours for bracelets. "There's tons of artists that will bezel and set it," says Holman, "and there's just a high demand." She pauses to laugh. "[If] I don't have it, people kind of harp on me until I make it.





The tourists love it, and the locals love it, too."

Holman began making jewelry well before she got her official training in art metals at Stout — "like the beer," she laughs — University in Wyoming. She arrived at shells naturally. "The seashells I've been doing for years, because of my love for beachcombing," she says. This is also how she arrived at the name for her work, SOL (Spanish for sun) by Heidi. The letters S-O-L are incorporated into each piece she makes, mostly soldered or stamped onto the back side. Even here, she doesn't skimp, often taking time to cut a hole in the back of a bezel so that the color of the

stone shows through. For Valentine's Day, she cuts small hearts.

She works as she talks, forming a bezel, the little silver cup that is shaped to and will hold a shell for a pendant. The motions look second nature to her, as well they should. "I've been making jewelry since I was a little girl," she says, firing up the blowtorch.

Wavehouse is a great place to spend an afternoon. While the food

and drink are standard fare — greasy, American, soda, beer, and mixers — the gigantic wave pools are not. For experts, there's the Bruticus Maximus billed as a ten-foot monster, a constantly barreling tube of water that packs a major punch. It's situated at the back of the Wavehouse, set up outdoors, like a stage, with hanging banks of stage lighting so that riders can go on long into the night. Music pumps from huge amplifiers, typical Green Day, along with a few pop-country numbers. Bruticus is where the pros hang out; sponsored flowboarders flip and splash across the jetting sheets, flying high over the lip before plummeting back down into the fray. Flowboarding, which is a bit like surfing, is done either on bodyboard-like boards or finless, stand-up ones the size of snowboards. It's harder than it looks; over at the Flowmaster, which is a simple, single jet of water pumped up a small ramp, novices test their skills. It's an odd mix of people; big, burly men dwarf the tiny kids they stand with in line. The kids, largely preteen boys, flip and carve and turn like seals in their wetsuits, laughing and slapping each other on the back. Some are so small they can barely push against the weight of the jetting water. For the next session,

one intrepid young girl joins the pack of boys and men. She steps up for her turn apprehensively but is soon sliding down like a pro, big grin on her face. "Hi!" she yells cheerily at the onlookers as she nears the end of the ride. "Yeah, Alana!" her family cheers back.

After their run, the boys, shivering in their wetsuits, skitter their way to the foot of the thundering Bruticus, sliding into the hot tubs built into its base. They watch the flowboarders, one male, one female, as they show off their tricks, cheering when someone does something spectacular. Moms and siblings bring them Cokes and lemonade,

and they sip them from the safety of the hot tub as the water pounds in front of them.

However well the kids manage the Flowmaster, this is no indication of how those over the median age of 17 will fare. The older crowd has a much harder time. They step gingerly onto their boards and struggle for balance, skidding down the slight incline before biting the dust at the end. Some of these men are avid surfers; one onlooker whispers to another, watching as his friend skids out and falls in an impressive spray of water, "That guy surfs Mavericks!"

Out of the waves, it's pretty much the same beach/water park scene.

Families gather under cabana-style umbrellas to eat; crowds of skater kids, decked out in fake metallic Mardi Gras beads, clog the tables closest to Bruticus. Some are clearly surfers, watching the wave calmly, calculating. Others are just there for the atmosphere, drinking beer and dogging girls. "Dude, that's my daugh*ter*," one woman says good-naturedly, tugging a blonde girl away from a group of college-age kids. To the girl she says, swatting her playfully on the arm, "I can't take you anywhere."

In the back, tables are lit by glass-encased candles, highlighting the featured art that hangs on the wall. The DJ booth is back here too and, under it, a parked motorcycle.

In the early hours, Bluefoot is roomy and mellow. Couples and friends shoot pool to Sting's offbeat rhythms. Morrissey floats across the high ceilings like silk. Voices meld. Balls click. The flirting duo at the end of the bar ease their knees closer. College basketball rages on a few of the flat-screen televisions that frame the bar. The feather-haired bartender chews gum and restocks bowls of party mix. The options are

plentiful: Shoot pool. Look at art. Drink, inside or out. Watch. Yak. Stock the digital jukebox, which reverberates nicely around the main space. Sneak smooches in the back

room when nobody is looking.

As Bluefoot heats up, it becomes clear that this is a melting pot of a hangout. There's a range of ages, from postcollegiate to pre-Vietnam,

gay and straight, male and female, black and white. There's a diversity not seen in most bars, and a rare camaraderie. People talk to each other, make introductions, laugh over their drinks.

Nobody sits alone. Nobody scowls.

Pool, especially, levels the playing field. SHIT IS BALLIN': Stuff is expensive and/or topof-the-line. Usually meant to be complimentary, as on the webpage for local skate supply/fashion firm Streetmachine USA, which uses the phrase to hype equipment also said to be "on point like the Richter scale" (referencing Charles Richter's scale for rating earthquake magnitude). Sometimes used derogatorily to describe the gear of a poseur whose expensive equipment is meant to mask deficient ability.

SLEEVAGE: A form of (usually female) breast cleavage, seen from the side courtesy of low-cut or large sleeve openings that reveal so-called "side boob." Outdoor summer concerts at Humphrey's frequently bring out much attendant sleevage.

STUDYING HIS/HER ANATOMY: Openly gawking at someone's physical attributes, as popularized last year in a ubiquitous Cingular phone commercial featuring Armenian actress Angela Sarafyan (frequently called "the Cingular Umbrella Girl" online). In the ad, with its own cult following à la Mentos mania, she stands in the rain beneath a clear umbrella while breathlessly telling viewers about seeing her girlfriend's ex in the school library "studying the anatomy of a certain friend of ours." Now oft heard at local events characterized as "meat markets," such as Club Tremors at the PB Bar and Grill, where casually diminutive beach wear often allows for nearly literal application of the phrase.

THIZZ: High on the drug ecstasy. "Thizzle" is an ecstasy "brand" name, and "getting thizz" is a phrase closely associated with the hyphy scene. 





in relation to the Regents Road bridge and the Sunroad Building scandals, that "they [Aguirre and Frye] need the help of citizen groups like ours that are willing and able to take the City on in the courts, the one venue where there is a level playing field."

I applaud your efforts and appreciate the tremendous costs incurred by confronting civic crimes judicially. But you are in error: the courts are not the only venue with a level playing field (really? with judges paid by the government?).

Fortunately, our Founding Fathers created a means to more cheaply and directly accomplish your ends: in the last clause of the First Amendment to our U.S.

Constitution. Until recently, this clause, the right to petition any level of government for the redress of grievances, had never been tested. We the People Foundation for Constitutional Education (http:// www.givemeliberty.org/) is currently at the federal appellate court level seeking a positive definition of that clause. For years, Congress and the executive branch have hidden behind "sovereign immunity" arguments against mandatory responses to four WTP petitions, which claimed harm suffered by a defined class of citizens as a result of government actions abhorrent to the U.S. Constitution.

There is a county-level test of this right (by the founder of WTP) that is in play as well. As you may recall, our Revolutionary War was instigated by King

George's claim of sovereign immunity from petition enforcement. Have we come full circle so soon?

By this time many such petitions are in play locally around the country. Why? Because most folks don't have the deep pockets to fight the government in court every time it breaks the law.

Of course, the lawyer union (including judges) doesn't want this petition right to see the light of day because it will cut out their huge litigation fees. Just think of how much money and time could be saved by avoiding the courts! This route should be implemented here ASAP because the large volume of government crimes cannot be efficiently addressed judicially. Lee Sullivan via e-mail

Walk on Water Competition

A S ometimes students will create something that is super stable but becomes too heavy and laborious to even move it," says Leonard Perry, professor of industrial engineering at the University of San Diego. "They'll have a structure that is really wide and heavy and sturdy, and you can stand on it and not fall, but they'll forget about the idea that they have to move that [structure] across an entire 25-meter swimming pool."

This weekend USD hosts the 16th Annual Walk on Water Competition, in which participating high school and college students design and build a pair of



water-walking "shoes" and then demonstrate the efficacy of their creations. "It takes 20 to 30 hours to

make a pair of shoes," says Martin Teachworth, physics teacher and science team coach for La Jolla High. "That's from 'Let's sit down and talk about it' to getting shoes that are completely finished. At the end of that 30 hours, they're ready to put them in the pool and practice walking."

Judges will be looking for three things: buoyancy, stability, and propulsion. Shoes must be less than eight feet long, and the cost of the materials cannot exceed \$100. "There are design restrictions, just like you'd have in the real world," explains Perry. "[Students are] incorporating engineering principles using the whole engineering design process — coming up with sketches, figuring out propulsion, stability, and flotation." Most of the entrice are made from

Most of the entries are made from

Styrofoam and duct tape. "One of the better designs was Styrofoam wrapped in fiberglass," says Perry. Perry has seen shoes made with inner tubes, two-liter plastic bottles, PVC piping, metal, and cardboard. His favorite design incorporated a paddle wheel for propulsion, "like the ones you see on old riverboats."

Teachworth describes most shoes as "two fat skis, eight feet long, a foot wide, and about four inches thick." Propulsion is particularly difficult to achieve. "You need to design a shoe so it will glide forward, but as soon as you move your foot back, you need it to grab the water, otherwise your feet will go back and forth, like on an elliptical machine — a lot of work but no motion. You have to design things to grab the water underneath."

The first year that students of Teachworth's participated in the competition (1996), their design consisted of wooden shoes with wooden flaps affixed beneath. "They were 12 inches long, so they floated," Teachworth remembers. "When they'd go forward, great, but when they went backward, they didn't go down and grab the water." To solve the problem, students filled empty dog food cans with rocks and affixed them to the flaps. To seal the wood they used leftover purple house paint. "They were the godawfulestlooking shoes you've ever seen, but darned if they didn't win," says Teachworth. The team took first place in the high school division; in the overall competition, they were second to a college team. One of those students is now an electrical engineer, another an aeronautical engineer, and a third just received a doctorate for geophysics.



Mishaps do occur. "The ratio is: If you make shoes shorter than you are tall, you're probably going to fall over front or back," says Teachworth. "Anything that can go wrong, does. Kids will get partway across, and then their shoes will fill with water and sink." One student accidentally put his foot through one of his cardboard shoes before the competition. His winning shoes of the same design from the year before had been kept at the USD campus and had been thrown in a trash bin earlier that morning, so the student fished one of his old shoes from the trash to replace the damaged one. The same design, as long as it is one's own, can be used year after year.

Though there have been many patents for water-traversing shoes (the

first of which was filed by Bostonian H.R. Rowlands in 1858), Perry does not yet see practical uses for water-walking technology. "It's more of a way to get high school students interested in science and engineering," he says, "which has always been labeled dull and boring and for nerds." — Barbarella

A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND | BY JERRY SCHAD

he Chiquito Trail, a multiuse (hiking, mountain biking, horseback riding) route down from Blue Jay Campground to Ortega Highway in the Santa Ana Mountains, is best explored (if hiking) in the one-way, downhill direction. Mountain bikers can use the local roads to fashion a loop. Along the trail you can enjoy cool passages through canyon bottoms and a long, view-rich traverse across a sunny ridge.

Your expedition begins just outside the campground, which is 2.5 miles up Long Canyon Road from Ortega Highway. It ends along Ortega Highway itself at the

San Juan Loop Trail parking lot, which is opposite a local landmark called the Candy Store. The store is 21 miles east of Interstate 5 at San Juan Capistrano and about 10 miles west of Lake Elsinore near Interstate 15.

The starting point is actually the upper terminus for the San Juan Trail, which wends its way west for many miles, ending at a place called Hot Spring Canvon. You go only 1.8 miles downhill on the gently meandering San Juan Trail to the Chiquito Trail junction, and make a left turn there.

On the Chiquito Trail you descend east into the upper reaches of Lion Canyon, which normally has water flowing in it through the spring and early summer. In the next two miles you follow the bottom of Lion Canyon, downhill. That stretch is delightful, with patchy shade provided

by large oaks — the survivors of wildfires — and young sycamores. On the banks of the creek you'll find poison oak (which hopefully you can identify and avoid); wild blackberry vines: toyon bushes: barberry shrubs: and ceanothus shrubs (aka "wild lilac"). Profuse displays of monkeyflower brighten the scene in April and May. The red monkeyflower and the sticky (yellow-flowered) monkeyflower may have hybridized here: the spectrum of monkeyflower colors includes orange, pink, and magenta, as well as the usual scarlet and light yellow hues.

At 4.2 miles, the trail makes an abrupt bend to the left and begins a long traverse across the ridge to the east. Just below this bend is Chiquito Falls, where the stream drops about 15 feet over an outcrop of granite. Impressive only after heavy rains, the site is a pleasant one anytime for a picnic.

Rising through scrubby chaparral and granitic boulders, the trail works around to a south-facing slope. The din of traffic from Ortega Highway less than one beeline mile away is enough to convince you the end is near, but it's not. Instead, the trail curves northeast and crookedly descends for another two miles to a tributary of San Juan Canyon. During the long, downward traverse, look for hawks and golden eagles riding the thermals, and squirrels or lizards scurrying around at ground level.

Once you are in the tributary (wet or dry, depending on the amount of recent rainfall) you continue one more mile to the wide creek in San Juan Canyon.

his Dr. Bronner's Magic Soap brand has generated controversy for its hemp content, he couldn't have imagined that the product would lead to the arrest of a pioneering punk drummer.

"I never knew him before this psychodrama," says Bronner about Germs drummer Don Bolles, who was arrested April 4 in Newport Beach.

"They said my brake light



GUILTY OF DRIVING IN NEWPORT BEACH (BOLLES) "Field tests are notoriously inaccurate," says Bronner, who paid for Bolles's bail, attorney, and court fees after hearing of the arrest. "The



guy's a really straight-up, open-book guy. He was guilty of being a punk-rock-looking dude driving in Newport Beach, which is full of rich white people....

"The Newport Beach cops had arrested someone earlier that day for GHB, and I think they just had GHB on the brain." Bronner says lab results — due in a couple of weeks — will prove Bolles's innocence.

"Bronner got me a pretty potent attorney," says Bolles. "I could have plea-bargained this away, but it seems so wrong because all I had was soap. I didn't even know what GHB was. I fancy myself a hipster, but it's a rather sad day when a hip punk rock drummer has to find out what a recreational drug is from a cop."

Bolles, 50, says he now stands by Dr. Bronner's soap more than ever: "It gives me the complexion of a 15-yearold girl." — Ken Leighton

The Few, the Proud, the Rocking Metal singer/guitarist Josh McArdle and two other Marine corporals formed Hatchet Wound in Iraq. Now at Camp

Wound in Iraq. Now at Camp Pendleton, they practice in a 10' by 10' barracks; they started in McArdle's, moved to the drummer's (Hunter Schmaus), and now play in the bassist's room (Matt Brothers).

"The manager of the barracks flips out because we have so much [equipment]," says McArdle. "They say, 'You need to get that shit out of

your room.' All we do is just move it three rooms down." McArdle says that upon reaching the rank of E-4 (which all

of E-4 (which all three have), the Marines will pay extra to allow for a larger, off-base residence.

"If you have a lot of household goods that overwhelm the barracks, they will help you out. If you have couches and shit, you can get it, but if you have \$20,000 in band equipment, you have to stay in your jail cell." The three leatherneck

rockers pass out their eightsong CD to other Marines, civilian bands, and at off-base music venues.

"If I meet another band and I give them a demo, it's, like, 'Yeah, these guys are fucking jarheads, fuck these clowns. They aren't real musicians.'...

"Being in the Marine Corps is like being in a completely different society. You're in Southern California, but there are walls around the base that isolate you from everything else.... But being in the Marine Corps definitely

reach perfection." The men intend to continue playing music in California when their four

years are up next year. "The music scene out here is completely different," says McArdle, who is from Asheville, North Carolina. "It's more competitive than it is back home. We don't even have a Guitar Center." McArdle says each bandmember got tattoos on their arms before March 31, beating the ban on new body ink below the elbow.

"They would rather enforce a tattoo policy than make sure we have hot water or heat and air conditioning in our rooms. I think it's bullshit. They say they want to preserve Marine tradition when it is the tradition for Marines to have tattoos."

bookstores. "It's state law. We're required to collect tax on anything sold in our stores. And if musicians are selling directly to the audience, then we're required to collect and report tax on that, which we have no way of doing. So what musicians need to do is have a

California Seller's permit [issued] through the State Board of Equalization. Then, they're responsible for it and we're not... A couple [performers] have already downloaded the forms from the State Board of Equalization.

Earp declined to comment, but on Wednesday, April 11, he sent out another mass email with this subject heading: "I'll be at Borders El Cajon this Friday night 4/13 with guitarist Rick Ruiz." Earp wrote that "After browsing the BOE site, I've concluded that — from a standpoint of legality ---- they are absolutely right!'

Gibb says there is no crackdown by the state under way and that to his knowledge neither Borders nor any other venues have been cited. "It was merely an effort on my part to make things right."

One insider believes the show-shuffling has to do with





Folks Worth Saving Folk Arts Rare Records owner Lou

Curtiss was recently awarded \$35,128 by the Grammy Foundation Grant Program to preserve 400 tapes of concert performances.

"It only covers a fraction of my collection, but it's a start," he says. "I got my first reel-toreel recorder in 1957, and I have over 8000 reels of live shows." The Grammy Foundation this year awarded

a total of \$650,000 to 18 recipients; the money will be used to preserve music and for research projects. The UCLA Library and the Library of Congress will

be digital repositories for copies of Curtiss's tapes. "I taped all 20 years of the

San Diego Folk Festival," says Curtiss, referring to the annual event he launched at SDSU in 1967, "and a lot of Adams Avenue Roots Festivals. The local events go all the way back to the early '60s, with guys like Mississippi John Hurt, Reverend Gary Davis, Ramblin' Jack Elliott, and a Big Joe Williams concert I taped around 1960.... Aside

from what I taped, I've acquired several collections, including one from a guy who used to follow the Duke Ellington Band and tape them in the '50s."

Curtiss says it's been a challenge to choose which 400 tapes to preserve. However, the oldest tapes aren't his biggest concern. The stuff from the '60s

and '70s on their original reels

hasn't deteriorated much. It's the tapes from the '80s that are fading [because] they were using inferior-quality components. Those are the recordings that need to be saved before they're gone forever.' — Jay Allen Sanford

an Diego's Maria Claire is one busy bassist — she currently plays in four bands: Citizen Band ("power country rock on ephedra, caffeine, and Jameson"), the Cindy Lee Berryhill Band, the Barbara Nesbitt Band ("beau-

tiful harmonies you need to hear to believe"), and, on occasion, the Cathryn Beeks Ordeal. She adds, "I've also played with Dave Howard, Gregory Page, Lisa

Sanders, Tim Flannery, Sven-Erik Seaholm, Chuck Schiele, Christopher Dale, Spud Davenport, Girl Trouble, the Coyote Problem, Not Your Mom — a girl band! — Frank Williamson, and Dani Carroll.'

Claire also went to junior high and high school with Eddie Vedder of Pearl Jam. "We were acting partners in our freshman year at San Dieguito High in Encinitas.

She feels music, right now, "has got to go back to its roots. Stuff like what the Meters did in the '70s — music that makes you move in that way that electronically assisted music just can't. We're in the midst of the pendulum effect," she claims. "We went very techno in the late '90s, just based on the idea that we actually could go techno. But the soul of music was compromised in the process. There are plenty of good producers, both internationally and right here in San Diego, that are committed to bringing the soul back. The pendulum will swing back to the real funk and soul."

TRICKIEST PROBLEM PLAYING LIVE?

"Usually it's logistics — just getting drums and big amps to fit on stages built for open mikes. I've almost taken a head or two off of unsuspecting customers at the Ould Sod. Sometimes it's grouchy patrons who've been at a bar/club since noon and have been overserved by the time

the band rolls in. And sometimes, it's getting my low A440 [string] to stop ringing in a big room.

FAVORITE GUITAR?

"My main bass, 'Goldie,' a 1982 Custom Fender Jazz with gold hardware. Quite the pimp bass. So, yeah, do the math: I've had her for 25 years.

MICHAEL HEMMINGSON She plays so great, and she's been with me to Memphis, on USO tours, and, most importantly, she's always there when I'm going through bad times. Goldie is my favorite friend; she's a great listener."

BEST GIG?

"For sheer massive rock 'n' roll factor, I'd say when our band Main Street Magic performed as a finalist at the International Youth Talent Competition at the Memphis Coliseum. It was big. It was loud. I was 19 years old. Oh, and we lost the competition to somebody from Japan."

WORST GIG?

"That'd be a tie between the night I had a saladsized bowl of popcorn thrown at me onstage by a drunken fan that wanted 'more Chairman of the Board!' and playing a gig in an inch of standing water - yes, with electric instruments - with my cover band Balance, up in the hills above La Mesa. I figured it would be very rock 'n' roll to die by way of gig electrocution.'

EARLIEST MEMORY?

"Getting stitches in my forehead after splitting my head open on park equipment while my parents were having a make-out session under a tree. I was three years old."

PROM NIGHT?

"I didn't go to my San Dieguito prom, but I went



to Fallbrook High's prom with Marc Burchstead. We went to the Cask 'n' Cleaver in Oceanside for dinner, then the prom at Camp Pendleton. Yes, I actually went to the dance.'

WHAT'S IN YOUR CD PLAYER?

"The rough tracks to the solo CD I'm working on. Why? To decide which songs to ax and which to keep and to try to decide if I'm really any good."

END-OF-THE-WORLD CDs?

"I asked Gene Simmons this same question at Kiss Unplugged, and all I got out of it was an inappropriate proposition. I'll actually give you an answer:

- 1. Incubus, Make Yourself 2. The Best of the Police
- 3. Fleetwood Mac, Rumours
- 4. Blind Boys of Alabama, Higher Ground
- 5. NWA, Straight Outta Compton

I can't believe I don't have jazz or classical — I'd need a longer list.²

FAVORITE SAN DIEGO HANGOUTS?

"Besides my sweetheart's house? I'd have to say, for music, the Belly Up Tavern. For fun eats, the new Aussie restaurant/bar Bondi in the Gaslamp. They have fishing baskets to sit in, and, drum roll please, Coopers on tap, mate! For getting jiggy, let's go to the Lime Tequila Bar."

It came as little surprise when Sean Lennon or his older half-brother Julian made recordings that sat well within the sonic footprint left behind by their famous father. The reviews were tedious; some thought Julian a John Lennon rip-off, some picked on Sean's guitar playing, while others still attempted to lump the boys into the "sons following in the paths of dead rock star dads" category, like Jason Bonham or Ziggy Marley. It is not a fault to be influenced by, or even to sound like, one's father, especially when the paternal imprint looms as large as that of a former Beatle or member of Led Zeppelin. Anyone who wonders where Jeff Buckley got his intense, unique sound need only listen to his

As Enchanting as You Want

Rarely in theater has someone so confused been so eloquent.

 lawed scripts, polished productions.
 The long, sketchy first act of *Enchanted* April, at Lamb's Players, recalls Chekhov's Three Sisters. But instead of going to Moscow, you wonder if four depressed women in 1922, under what seems a permanent downpour in Hampstead, north-REV

ern London, will ever make it to sunny Italy. Lotty and Rose talk about go-

ing and plan and assure each other that a vacation from husbands who pay them no heed's the right thing. They discuss finances. They invite Lady Caroline and Mrs. Graves (the former young and flapper-"modern," the latter ancient and stonegruff; both emotional shut-ins). We meet the self-centered husbands, and Anthony Wilding, the thoughtful owner of San Salvatori, a small castle on the Mediterranean the women will rent for the month of April. We hear about "before" and "after," of enchantment, risk-taking, and Lotty's visions, which assure everyone that Tuscan sunshine and endless fields of spring flowers can effect miraculous changes. All the while, the characters dress in black, and beads of rain perspire down the sole window of Mike Buckley's curtain-shrouded set.

For Act Two, the stage does a Kansas-Oz. Sunshine basks a marble colonnade, from which white

wisteria droop like ripe grapes, with an orange glow. The play metamorphoses too. Cold characters thaw. Gloom departs. Smiles emerge. And every scene in Act Two gets better than the last. What had seemed tedious turns out to be a modest charmer.

Matthew Barber adapted the play from Elizabeth von Arnim's novel The Enchanted April, which, you'd swear, the movie Under the

Tuscan Sun ransacked. Barber chose a 50/50 ratio of before (Hampstead in Act One) and after (Italy). Though it honors von Arnim's then-andnow theme and also suggests World War I and its aftermath, the balance creates a persistent sense throughout Act Two that entertaining material had to be trimmed. Farcical opportunities, even the characters' emotional blossomings, often rush by, as if late for the next luxury liner back to Britain.

To her credit, director Deborah Gilmour Smyth accepts the play's structural flaws and doesn't try to sweep them under the carpet. Instead, with a terrific ensemble cast, and accompanied by a cello fishtailing through the scene changes, she sustains a light, breezy tone, as if to say: this April in Mezzago, Italy, will be as enchanting as you want; it's up to you.

Which is the attitude of Lotty, the seemingly

daffy, though sneaky-wise, tour guide. Kerry Meads does some of her best work ever as the unlikely enchantress, whose good nature and gentle persistence slowly convince you that she can, in fact, see a bright future, even if it looks bleak from here.

Rich is confused. He never found a "breakthrough cause, something that puts me on the other side ... with the people who know they're alive." Rarely in theater has someone so confused been so eloquent. And that goes for all the characters in John Patrick Shanley's 90-minute "watercolor," Sailor's Song. Everyone makes explanatory - nay, summary statements about life and the need to quit daydreaming and make fundamental choices (take the bird in the hand; forget the two in the bush). The play thinks its ideas for you.

Sailor's Song's a memory play. Rich returns to a crossroads, years ago, when he learned that "love isn't being saved by an angel," that beauty fades and "it all ends in bones." Rich fell for two sisters: Lucy, a realist; and Joan, a spiritmedium. Even though his uncle John orders him to "chose one, even the mad one, and let the other go," Rich wants to suspend the moment just prior to deciding. In effect, he denies life, while John, though he talks a good game, denies his wife's death — the salt-and-pepper symmetry typical of Shanley's schematic approach.

New Village Arts' excellent production makes mystical

what the play renders explicit: before a wall of stars, actors waltz expertly to Strauss's "Blue Danube"; a rowboat actually rows across Nick Fouch's appealing, understated housefaçade and restaurant tables set; a Dance of Death unfolds to Otis Redding's immortal "Try a Little Tenderness" (though one prefers the Live in Europe version). Director Kristianne Kurner and choreographers Robin Christ (who performs the Dance of Death) and Kathy Meyer create the fluid dreamscapes everyone

tells Rich to avoid. Manny Fernandes makes Rich engaging and infuriating: you want to yell at him to climb down from that cloud. Doren Elias's gruff John overflows with Shanleyean sagacity. The playwright pens dialogue in HEADLINES. Elias — no mean feat - makes them seem spontaneous. Dressed in Jessica John's flowing summer silks, Amanda Morrow and Amanda Sitton charm as Lucy and Joan, the saltand-pepper sisters. Morrow gets the best line: when Lucy pleads her case for Rich's love, she says that just because Joan "can see around a corner once in a while doesn't make her sane."

Hold Please

Unlike the movie 9 to 5, which skewers a sexist pig boss, in Annie Weisman's barbed comedy, the philandering CEO remains in charge. She concentrates, instead, on the wars of the cubicles: two generations of secretaries form fragile alliances, then backstab and connive — and raise disturbing questions about "sisterhood" in the contemporary workplace. The play could use a stronger engine (emotional arcs tend to zigzag, and in trying not to tie a cozy knot, the conclusion verges on gender stereotypes). But it's got Weisman's genuine gifts for snappy dialogue, precise, revealing detail, and rafter-rattling humor. Weisman's women may not be likable, but the Old Globe production makes it easy to worry about them. Stephanie Beatriz plays young Erika as confident and spicy, even though Erika's choices make you wonder how deluded a person can be. Starla Benford's Grace seems at peace, but isn't. Kandis Chappell gives disillusioned Agatha human touches that keep her from becoming a grotesque caricature (here and elsewhere Mary Larson's costumes — Agatha all gray business, Erika nightclub-ready reds — define character to a T). Weisman's most devastating portrait is young Jessica, Mercurial, intellectually flighty, she has "Google-consciousness." She knows snippets about stray subjects, culled from Wikipedia blurbs, and assumes that the Internet has all the answers. Kate Arrington gets every inch of the woman for whom even a black eye is a good thing. The openingnight performance needed a brisker pace, especially between scenes. On the plus side, director Kirsten Brandt and lighting designer David Lee Cuthbert give the realistic piece an expressionisticabsurdist aura. Phones don't ring; lights flash around the stage rim, suggesting that the time may come when even one secretary at the firm will be "redundant."

Worth a try.

How I Learned to Drive

The title sounds innocuous. But it refers to the stages in which Li'l Bit's Uncle Peck became her abuser. Paula Vogel's 1997 drama, on just about everyone's "Best Plays of the '90s" list, reveals its horrific subject by indirection. Uncle Peck doesn't fit the drooling stereotype (Vogel says he should resemble Gregory Peck in *To Kill a Mockingbird*). And Li'l Bit is divided in half by three: "half wanting to run, half wanting to get it over with, half wanting to be held by him." The script also calls for music from the '60s (songs like the Ronettes' "Be My Baby" and Joe Cocker's "You Are So Beautiful" take on a disturbing tinge in the context of pedophilia). Lynx Performance and director Al Germani have done one of their finest efforts. Where Vogel asks for the suggestion of a song, members of the six-person cast, like a Greek chorus, often sing the entire version a cappella (and often beautifully, though whole songs lag the pace). Unlike the script, which has a fortysomething Li'l Bit narrate, Germani cast preteen Alicia Randolph. She plays "Li'l Girl" — i.e. Li'l Bit prior to her uncle's abuse. The choice is striking, but Randolph needs to enunciate her speeches much more clearly. The nonlinear play moves about like a lost drunk driver. Michelle Procopio negotiates Li'l Bit's emotional zodiac with impressive intensity. Krista Bell, Allie Dana, and Kevin Koppman-Gue play multiple roles (and sing) effectively. And Jude Evans rightfully understates, to the point of being eerie, Uncle Peck, who, were it not for his harrowing perversity, would seem the most "normal" male in the story. 





(artistic director Gary Kramer says the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. The night I caught the show, three San Diego comedians played a challenge match against players from the San Jose franchise. Using suggestions from the audience, they played "Emotional Sympathy," "Shakespeare," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag," with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners got booed; quick wit rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledge failure, abundantly, then forget it). It made for a lively, often quite funny, evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian Worth a try.

The Oresteia

Marianne McDonald and J. Michael Walton's new translation combines

Aeschylus's classic, doom-haunted trilogy (Agamemnon, The Libation Bearers, The Eumenides) into a single evening of theater. And except for inevitable and lengthy exposition (the first half hour, in fact), the vigorous script captures much of the original's sweep, from Agamemnon's double-bind sacrifice of Iphigenia (damned if he does, or doesn't) to Orestes's mirroring his father's plight (the Furies will torment him whether he kills Clytemnestra or not), though not all of its depth (a revision could also look at the pace of events, since the "greatest hits of the Oresteia" approach piles tragedy upon tragedy with relentless haste). The moderndress 6th@Penn production, however, blares through the speeches and scenes, undercutting the strengths of the text. D.H. Auden wrote that "evil is unspectacular and always human." Director Douglas Lay opts for the spectacular, almost nonstop, and encourages actors to force rather than feel intensities. Evervone urges their speeches onto the audience, often blurring the words in the process. Lay has had success with Greek tragedy before — his Iphigenia in Aulus was quite memorable — but this production lacks his usual polish and clarity: even a chorus of Libation Bearers, and another of the devil-red clad Furies, sing so harshly the words get lost. Anyone unfamiliar with the epic story would get lost as well. Much of the acting is amateurish. The standouts make it appear more so. Donal Pugh, whether he's an Agamemnon glad to be home after a decade of war, or an above-the-fray Apollo, commands the stage and delivers his lines with precise, fluid phrasings. As does Monique Gaffney (who is having quite a 2007) as a regal Athena and thrice-cursed Cassandra, the seer no one believes (best moment: when Apollo declares that women are unnecessary for childbirth, Athena raises an eyebrow that, were it a tinge more severe, could flatten Mt. Twice winner of the Pulitzer Prize (for Fences in 1987 and The Piano Lesson in 1990), Wilson wrote a cycle of dramas that probe the African-American experience through the decades of the 20th Century (he concentrated, he said, on the "largest idea that confronted blacks in each decade"). The readings will also be staged at the Performance Annex in City Heights and other locations. The series will culminate in a week-long staged reading festival of all the plays at Cygnet in June 2007. Next offering: The Piano Lesson. Worth a try.

A cross between improvisational comedy and Family Feud. Improv. making up a funny scene as you go along, is tough enough. Add competitive scene making, with the audience awarding points to the winning team. Purists might balk at the odiousness of comparisons used in this format, but the "game show" on Fridays - is a hoot. The 90-minute evening offers different bits. The show I caught had "Team Sports" - two pairs of players competed, taking suggestions from the audience; and "Gorilla Theatre" five directors invented scenes, using the other four as actors. The winner got a banana, the loser a "forfeit" (other formats include "Micetro" and "Improv Survivors"). Some attempts went nowhere (I repeat: improv is tough; I did it in my, as hindsight reveals, callow youth). Others made amazing twists and turns. The group makes the hits much more frequent than the misses. Their guru, Keith Johnstone, wrote one of the very best books I've ever read about making theater. And they put his pearls to good use. Their motto: "Remember, when it's not funny, it's art.'

Worth a try.

The Treatment

Everything in Amy Chini's set is gray: the walls, the furniture, even the window-blinds. Jennifer Setlow's lighting, especially an overhead lamp casting a soft yellow pyramid onto the table, darkens the room even more. Eve Ensler's stage direction for her 90-minute drama says the set could be "a modern psychiatrist office or a torture chamber." For Moxie's production, Chini makes it both, which builds on the play's ruling metaphor: like psychiatrists, military interrogators are "trained to read people" and to get "confessions," which may include having to break down the patient/subject. The two characters in the tense 90-minute drama don't have names. Man was an interrogator who has, at the very least, post traumatic stress disorder from having to "soften up the animals" in a war zone. Woman is a military therapist trying (or is she?) to help him recover his mind. They are amid a 'new war" with "new rules," and both feel free to break them to achieve their aims. Ensler never names the war and has pared away so many details that the play runs on only one track (it feels more like a short story than a novel). Jennifer Eve Thorn and Matt Scott handle their assignments - i.e. playing unspecified people who know each other's tactics - quite well (though Scott tended to push for the madness on occasion). Delicia Turner Sonnenberg has directed with a sharp eye for shifts of status, making the stage a battlefield of dueling in-

terrogators. Worth a try.

Food Porn

Jack's La Jolla has been on my "must do" list ever since it opened well over a year ago, but the daunting question was always "which Jack's?" The restaurant offers three distinct venues - the casual carnivore's moderately priced Grille; the seafoody top-floor Ocean Room, complete with view and sushi bar (with a sushi chef formerly at Ota); and the most formal venue, the Dining Room. Only way I could do them all would be to spend a week at a cheap motel in La Jolla. There are no cheap motels in La Jolla.

But then the Lynnester and Samurai Jim ate in the Dining Room during Restaurant Week and came back all a-rave. Three days of wrestling with TurboTax had yielded a nice refund [sound effect: slot machine paying off], which deserved a celebratory splurge dinner, so the Dining Room was the destination. Jack's now has an actual Jack dessert chef Jack Fisher, fleeing from Addison. Jack may jump restaurants a little too swiftly (a jumping Jack indeed), but I love his avant-garde desserts, and his move spurred me to head to La Jolla with the Lynnester branch of the posse in tow.

We mounted the dozen-odd black steps to the entry of a handsome white building and were shown to a chic but cozy room done in blacks, whites, and greys, with a choice of semicircular booths and regular tables. On the same floor, in the back, is an atriumlike area leading to an open kitchen (inaudible from the Dining Room); farther forward and to one side is a casual bar-lounge serving upscale pub grub (the inevitable Kobe sliders, etc.), and a staircase to the higher realms. A piano player spins out jazzy vintage pop (Sinatra tunes, "Girl from Ipanema," etc.) that you hear in the dining room as a civilized accompaniment to conversation, not an invasion of it.

All the dishes on the menu, start to finish, have adventurous touches. The starter we loved best was a work of creative comfort food that, alas, is out of season and off-menu now: a creamy celery-root soup topped with a "butterscotch froth" (made with a touch of maple syrup, and balsamic vinegar to cut the sweetness). The soup concealed crunchy diced fresh celery and earthy house-made miniravioli with a filling of shaved fresh black truffles and truffle juice, baked potato pulp, crème fraîche, and a little agar-agar (to bind it). This soup is just the kind of food San Diego needs more of, sensual and approachable but unexpected. Its replacement is a green garlic soup that I'd love to try.

An appetizer of poached Maine lobster brings two tender, shelled claws in a lobster stock enhanced by tangy Kaffir lime juice, and other Asian flavors, and fresh herbs, gentled by risotto rice but sparked by the acidity of sweet-tart sticks of Fuji apple. It's small but lovely.

Lynne loves the daily changing appetizer pas-

tas here, and that evening's choice was a have-tohave-it of twisty spiral macaroni (packaged, but from Italy) in a sort of Vietnamese seafood bouillabaisse that turned out to feature an intriguing vegetarian stock (made by simmering garlic, chiles, and ginger with Asian and West-

ern condiments and herbs in tomato-water, then straining out the solids to leave a tangy golden broth). The soup was swimming

with sweet shrimp (ama ebi in sushi lingo), shrimp, mussel meats, and baby octopus. The broth was thicker and sweeter than classic fish-based bouillabaisse, with a crunch of sautéed leeks - sexv both in taste and texture. Sometimes "food porn" is not in the words but in the mouth. Even the tiny octopi were tender, which means you can give in to the temptation of the baby octopus and fava salad (which we didn't try) with no fear of finding a plateful of rubber tarantulas.

Peekytoe crab salad sounded better than it tasted: "Fennel, sake, sea urchin broth," the menu said, plus a topping of tiny pieces of rosy sea urchin with vinaigrette. But I found the broth tart and too plentiful for the crab, and without warning, it proved spicy with Thai chilies. Much as I love hot pepper, which can do so much for the ubiquitous blue crab, it seemed excessive in the context of this delicate New England species.

The entrées were even better than the starters no letdown, no coasting. Muscovy duck breast was the canvas for a dish so brilliant it struck several of us as funny. The breast slices were "rosy" as ordered, tender and rich, rubbed with star anise and accompanied by parsnips and a sweet kumquat confit in which each dainty slice of fruit was indi-

vidually visible. But the Zen-foodie joke lay in an irresistible pile of toasted ground cocoa nibs: flour, butter, and sugar, baked and then seasoned with toasted ground cloves and run through a Cuisinart-equivalent. It's as though the chef had pared

down the classic Mex-haute combo of mole poblano with turkey-this was cocoa and game bird reduced to essentials, a logical but original combination that tasted stunning.

Crispy Jidori chicken was another killer. As Kobe is to beef and Berkshire hogs are to pork, the blacklegged Asian Jidori is to chickens - a breed raised for flavor, not fast growth or big breasts. And the cooks did it proud - not an overcooked morsel on either the upper or lower quarter of the half-chicken. The skin was as crisp as the menu advertised, and the tender meat tasted the way chicken used to taste, when it was a Sunday treat rather than a cheap commodity. (I'd bet Jidoris don't live the miserable life of "factory chickens" either.) Matching it strength for strength were well-conceived accompaniments of butternut squash ravioli (encased in delicate house-made pasta skins), black trumpet mushrooms, gently cooked greens, and rich brown butter tanged with Meyer lemon juice.

When we saw line-caught Maine cod on the menu, we all sat up. In New England, where cod has been a staple since colonial times, the species is now nearly extinct through overfishing. "Line caught" means, first, that it wasn't captured in one of the miles-long gillnets that have nearly wiped out the species — and also, that it's likely to have reached port fresh, the day it was caught. "This is the best cod I've ever eaten," said Mary Ann. For me - second best, only to the time I saw a day-

boat delivering cod to the waterfront dock of a seaside restaurant in Gloucester and decided to lunch there. (Tasted like sugar.) Delivered within 48 hours of its arrival on land, this was slow-cooked and tender, topped Portuguese-style with sweet peppers and slices of spicy chorizo, with a tropical-looking "leaf" of parsley purée painted along one side of the plate. Clams are supposedly part of the array, and in my doggie-bagged take-home, I even found one.

With two fowls and a fish, we needed a quadruped to round out the ranks. Roasted beef tenderloin was my companions' choice, mainly for its accompaniment of pickled short rib. (Lynne goes for short ribs whenever she sees them, and I certainly have no objections.) The tenderloin, splashed with its own jus, was a fine, tender piece of meat if that's what floats your boat. It is not, however, the most flavorful cut of the steer. The boneless pick-

led short-rib meat underlaid a heap of carrot confit, topped by crisp, almost baconlike shreds of shallot. (Never realized shallots had so much umami - the Japanese term for happy-meat flavor.) All very fine, but less interesting than our other dishes. (On a do-over, I'd choose Colorado lamb loin with cardamom crumbs, since I love cardamom better than beef.)

For desserts, we split our choices between a new Jack Fisher invention and, urged by the waiter, the restaurant's "signature dessert," carried over from the previous pastry regime. This dish is called "melting Valrhona," a combination of intensely sweet molten chocolate and intensely tart passionfruit purée over coconut cookies, all under a hard chocolate crust. The contrasts of sweet and sour, hard and soft, shock the mouth. I still don't know if I like the combination. I found the sweet chocolate cloying, the passionfruit almost painfully acidic. Perhaps they should rename the dish "melting sadomasochism."

All in all, I was glad Jack Fisher has replaced that dessert's inventor. Jack contributed a citrus gratin, with fresh fruit flavors ranging from sour grapefruit to tangy tangerine to something soft and sweet that I couldn't quite identify, which reminded me of mangosteen, the most prized and exotic citrus of Thailand. All were robed in an almond cream sauce, and on the side, three little balls of exquisite blood-orange sorbet. I joked that maybe Jack had heard I was coming and deliberately declined to make one of his supernal panna cottas, just to force me to try something else.

Service? Way better than average. The waiter was considerate, helpful but not hovering, and fully familiar with the menu. We loved the chance to have a conversation without fighting the all-too-frequent deliberate "party noise" common in splashy new restaurants. We were not in the least tempted to shoot the piano player in the lounge next door.

As luck would have it, I ate at Jack's on an evening when I was strangely un-hungry. This made for substantial doggy-bagging. Over the next five nights I gently reheated and re-tasted the lobster appetizer, pasta bouillabaisse, and all the entrées. Nearly every dish knocked my

than at the restaurant, now that I was free from the distractions of friends, waiters, music, and that continuous array of dishes. Savoring the flavors solo, one at a time in small quantities, rather than in a flashy parade, I realized what depths of flavor and culinary intelligence each held.

Few of us can afford to buy our own Picasso original, antique Tibetan thanka, or Song Dynasty scroll painting. (I'd bet that for those who do, these sublime objects devolve through familiarity into mere decor.) But at least for special occasions, many of us can manage a dinner where, bite by bite, we can experience bliss, even if the art vanishes down our gullets. So if vou value cooking for its creativity as well as its sensuality. consider going to Jack's Dining Room and deliberately ordering too much, to take home leftovers and taste them again with your full concentration engaged. Amazing stuff.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Tony DiSalvo grew up with great food in Highland Falls, New York, a suburb within commuting distance from Manhattan. "Food and cooking have always been important in my family. We're Sicilian, first generation, from a small town near Palermo. Sicilian food is very different from mainland Italian. with a lot of African influences. And luckily, I got to travel a lot

when I was younger - Spain, Italy, France — I hit the big ones. My father...was very interested in exploring, from the Sicilian village food he grew up with to Cantonese and Shanghai food, in depth. He would do a Peking duck the real way, with a fan in front of the sink, or jellyfish. He would research everything, and we would go to Chinatown and get all the ingredients, go to a fish market that would sell Japanese fish species. We would cook together — things like mu shu pork, making the pancakes from scratch. So I grew up as a real foodie, and as my interest in it grew more serious, I saw it was something that I could do. At age 13, I worked 'under the counter' during the summer in the kitchen of a hotel in my hometown - chopping vegetables, opening oysters, making deviled eggs for eight hours straight. So I could see the reality of restaurant cooking. I was lucky, I didn't go into cooking school with a false sense of what it was really like.

"I was considering going to the Culinary Institute of America when I was still in high school, and luckily, I had a contact through a friend of my father to Jean-Georges Vongerichten [noted French chef in New York, a pioneer of fusion] when he still had only two restaurants, Jean-Georges and Jo Jo's. I started working at Jo Jo's even before I went to the Culinary Institute,

and afterward I did my externship there. When I graduated in '95, I worked at a small French bistro that has one Michelin star now, La Goulue, and then I went to Gramercy Tavern and worked under Tom Colicchio [another noted New York chef] for almost three years, when he still had just the one restaurant. I've been fortunate to hit some pretty strong places. Then I worked at Jean-Georges for about seven years the last two of them as chef de cuisine. [Editor's note: the chef de cuisine is the number-two chef under the executive chef, charged with making sure the kitchen produces the executive chef's dishes properly. This includes cooking, tasting, and supervising sous-chefs.] I left to come to San Diego because Jack's made me a great offer, including a partnership, with the opportunity to do something totally new with my food - and I liked the prospect of raising my family out here. There's a lot of things I didn't get to do in New York that I could do here - including building a restaurant from scratch.

"It's important to me for what we're trying to represent that we use really good, fresh ingredients. We try to buy as much as possible locally. I don't go to Chino Farms in the winter, when their stuff is sort of bland, I go when it's interesting — in spring, summer, fall. Right now, it's vibrant and exciting, and I go there every day on my way to work. When you go every day, you get much more of a sense of what's best there, rather than just ordering over the Internet or by phone. We also use Cunningham Farms and La Milpa, but some of the produce companies here are also doing a really good job, getting produce grown closer to L.A. And we use Brandt beef, a natural product from this area. We use a specialty mushroom purveyor who gets fresh chanterelles and porcini and morels from Europe, Michigan, Washington State. I don't like to mention all the ingredient sources on the menu. People just have to trust us to find the best products, because that's such a major part of what we do.

"I think the most important thing in cooking is for each component to taste like what it is, and to build levels of flavor based on the essences of those flavors. If the dish is based upon the essence of each ingredient, I think you'll end up with something with more purity. If everything is masked with everything else, it's hard for each ingredient to express its own voice. That's where the cleanliness of the food comes in, and the separation of ingredients on the plate. If we put something on a plate, we want it to have a reason. At the core, we're just trying to take ingredients that go well with each other and make them interesting."

Butter-yellow walls, huge, elaborate wood backboard, massive wrought-iron and glass-globe chande-liers, and a mezzanine level where you can hit the books or get together with your novia. We sit near the window. Interesting art's for sale on the walls, like one painting with the words, "Insanity is merely an opinion.'

"Oh, yes!" I mutter, partly at that five-word message, partly from three magic words I see in the menu

"Breakfast all day."



Carla's following her nose. I get a whiff too cheese. Feta, maybe, or, like, those beautifully smelly cheeses the Europeans love, Camembert, Limburger. Carla leans over, sniffing the plates a waiter is bringing to two gents next door.

"Paninis," says one. "The Roma," says the other,

pointing to his. "The Tuscany," says the first. "Mine's the one with the blue cheese.'

Tuscany Man has a panini sandwich stuffed with roast beef, tomatoes, and lots of crumbled

blue cheese, plus a pile of potato salad speckled with, what, chives? Herbs? It all cost him \$7.55. Mr. Roma's sandwich is smoked turkey, he says, with bacon, Swiss cheese, tomatoes, and basil. A cup of vegetable soup is part of his \$7.55 deal. I see the Porto Fino gives you tuna, cheese, and tomato, same price. The Venice, with eggplant, cheese, and avocado, is ten cents less.

Hmm. We look at wraps: turkey, tuna, veggie, or spinach and cheese, all around the \$7.50 range. A chicken pita goes for \$8.95. Various sandwiches and salads are all about the same price. The chicken pecan salad, with roasted pecans and "garlic crustinis" for \$8.95, sounds tempting, but no. Once again, I fall into the breakfast trap. They have breakfast sandwiches, egg scramblers and egg burritos, and omelets. And the very first omelet I spot hits the spot. The Cortez. Eggs and hey hey! Sautéed shrimp. Plus mushrooms, jack cheese, avocado, and sour cream, with fruit or sautéed potatoes and a slice of baguette, for \$7.55. I order that (with spuds) and a medium coffee (\$1.75). Carla goes for exactly what I also hankered for, that smelly blue-cheese Tuscany panini with potato salad (she could have had pasta salad, chips, or a cup of soup), and coffee.

The irony is that when it comes, though I get into mine - love the sautéed potatoes and green peppers and the whole idea of the shrimp-andcream-stuffed omelet - even with some of their excellent house salsa, the shrimp feels a little watery, not enough sautéed flavor for me. I'm mulling this when Carla says, "Great panini, except it's too rich. No relief."

No problem. We swap. And man. Love it! Her Tuscany is just howling with flavor...the blue cheese, the beef, infused with artichoke aioli sauce. And the potato salad with — what? Rosemary? Basil? Nice herby flavor, anyway.

"Good." Carla's into my omelet. "They let you taste the shrimp. They don't drown it with garlic and spices.'

Guess that's why we're such a great item. So it's way past four by the time I walk with Carla down to her hair salon. She takes a deep

breath. "Just be there at 1134 when I get back? Please? Here. A sawbuck. Beer on me, okay?' Wow. Deal going down on Orange. One, I'd

forgotten what a sawbuck was till she handed me this \$10 note. Two, just as well she did, because brunch bust my bank.

It's the evening crowd when I get back, around five. Hey, it's happy hour. From the conversation, you'd swear every customer's a thespian from Lamb's Players next door. Yana's at the counter. Carla's friend's friend, whatever. Spunky, attractive gal. Her husband Brady's beside her. "Try a Coronado beer," she says. "Remember Rick? The guy who used to own 1134? He started up the brewery down the road.'

"How much?"

"Mermaid's Red Ale's \$4.75. Happy hour. Dollar off. Great beer, if you like it hoppy, and

The Devil in His Cellar

"France is known for great wine, but that will never happen down here, because we're just South America."

Batt, vice president for marketing and communications at Banfi Vintners (an import company). "Dramatic," in this case, seems an appropriate tone to strike, since what he's doing is describing the germination of Vindend merking the user d'a

of *Vineland*, perhaps the world's first musical about wine. "About a year ago, I was walk-

ing in the vineyards of Concha y Toro, in the shadow of the Andes," with Concha y Toro executive Giancarlo Bianchetti. "We were walking up a dusty road

to get a better vantage point for looking at the vineyard, and I said, 'What kind of interesting things have you been doing around the world?' He said, 'We're looking for unique ways to build a relationship with our consumers and with the trade. We want to create excitement, so that we become the excitement, so we can come into town and people will want to come and learn.' "

"There, under the Andes, Bianchetti paused. It was one of those wistful moments at the end of a long day," recalls Batt. "He said, 'Before I retire, I would really like to see, somehow, a play or something that would tell the story of the Casillero del Diablo. We've got this "Cellar of the Devil," with this legend attached to it, and it'd be really cool to do a play. Something where we're supporting the arts, but supporting them in a different way than having an art-gallery wine tasting.



Bringing our wine into the realm of the arts. But I don't even know how you would go about that. Would you hire a playwright...'"

Batt smiled. "He didn't know my background. I grew up as a writer and producer in the com-

mercial world — did a lot of stuff like that." (The *Vineland* program notes that Batt used to work "only offices apart" from fellow ad man David Mamet and that Mamet told Batt, "Someday, the stage will come alive with your words.") "I said, 'Let me look into this Don Melchor character.' " Don Mel-

chor de Concha y Toro is the man credited with creating the legend about a devil in his cellar. He wanted "to save the wine from being ferreted away by folks who might want to taste it," explains Batt.


Melchor turned out to be more than a clever storyteller. He was a senator and entrepreneur who had witnessed Chile's emergence onto the global economic stage through the mining of the Andes. "With that mindset, he said, 'What else can we do?' They were looking at the wine industry in Europe and saying, 'France is known for great wine, but that will never happen down here, because we're just South America.' And Melchor said, 'Let's see if we can change that.' He brought vines in from France — including Carmenere, which was wiped out in France by phylloxera but survives quite nicely here." as his wife Emiliana imported a French landscape designer — a sweet setup for playwright Batt. "I imagined what it would be like to have these two French guys in the middle of South America. The two became the play's comic relief, and their rapid-fire game of charades as they seek to distract Don Melchor garnered what was easily the show's biggest laugh. Batt piled on political intrigue, a fledgling love affair, and the strain created by Melchor's devotion to his work and to his wife. He called up his friend John Mills — "he heads up the jazz department at the University of Texas at Austin" — ordered up a score, and voila. "He took the Broadway style for the American ear, and he brought the South American idiom into it. It's entertainment. Wine is entertainment. A way to bring wine and entertainment together is clearly what the debut of Vineland the musical is all about.'

He also brought in a French viticulturist, even

Directing duties went to Chicago theater mainstay Marc Robin, who pulled together a cast, built a show around a set consisting of eight chairs and a backdrop, and took *Vineland* on the road. "It's a really entertaining evening of theater that's also incredibly educational about the wine for the people who drink it and sell it. I tried to explain it to my mom, and I said, 'It would be the equivalent of McDonald's putting on a show for anybody that's ever had a McDonald's product or worked in a McDonald's, so that they would understand where it came from.' How many people in industries just don't have a clue where the industry came from?"

The territory was not altogether unfamiliar but offered considerably more than what Robin was used to in the theater-as-marketing department. "I've done a lot of corporate things for pharmaceuticals, where you're basically putting on a show to launch a product. This was differ-

ent. This was really a play: you meet people, you care about them, you get invested in them. There are social issues. It's more than 'I want ten dancers to dance around this Chrysler Sebring, and we're going to make it so the girls are all wearing very little, and the boys all show their chests, and we'll sell the car.' There are people who are going to go just because they want to taste the wine. But we wanted to tell the story in an entertaining way, so that if your mother or brother or sister just happened to come upon it, they would want to sit and watch it, without even tasting the wine. I always try to get reactions from the people who were brought by somebody who wanted to be there, who were dragged along, and they've been really positive. They've been surprised by how

NORTH COASTAL

Americana 1454 Camino Del Mar (southwest corner at 15th Street), Del Mar, 858-794-6838. Housed in a historic building, this casual breakfast/lunch joint turns into a serious dinner house at nightfall. The cooking represents the American melting pot, featuring world-wide flavors. Mornings, along with flawless eggs Benedict and utopian waffles, you can get a "Roman breakfast" of prosciutto, mozzarella, and fried egg on English muffin. At dinner, don't miss the lamb chop and eggplant appetizer or the duck breast with fig sauce. During summer, some of the veggies come from chef-owner Randy Gruber's home garden; the French fries (which don't come from his garden) are world class. To finish, a banan *tarte tatin* shouldn't be resisted. Thoughtful, reasonable wine list. Breakfast (until 3 p.m.) and lunch daily, dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Kids' menu available. Breakfast and lunch inexpensive to moderate; dinner moderate to expensive. — A.M. (1/05)

Big Jim's Old South Barbecue North Coast Highway 101 (two blocks north of Encinitas Boulevard), Encinitas, 760-635-1166. At this outstanding barbecue, you can "Put Some South in Yo' Mouth!" The smokingwood is mellow hickory, and each type of meat (sublime "pulled pork," smoky skewered shrimp, huge pork ribs, chicken, beef ribs, steak) gets individ-ualized treatment, including a tangy Alabama-style mustard sauce for pork and chicken. (Beef gets the more familiar tomatoey Texas-style sauce.) You don't eat meat? The ever-expanding menu now includes a delicious, spicy blackened grilled salmon steak. Side dishes are superb: Don't miss the thick, smoky-sweet Brunswick stew (you'll not find its like anywhere on this coast), exemplary hush puppies, corn muffins with honey butter, well-balanced slaw...oh, just taste everything you can fit under your belt. Lunch and dinner daily. Low moderate. - N.W. (6/05)

The Bird House Grill 250 North Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-2882. A great place to check out real Turkish cuisine. The inside has a fine collection of blue-and-white wall plates and blue glass eyes to ward off evil spirits. Try the house specialty, Iskender Kebab (ground meat kebab, rice, tomato sauce, and house-grown yogurt) — "Iskender" means "Alexander." Or the Kofte plate (ground meat kebab, rice, salad, pita, and *tzatziki* sauce). The shepherd's salad is a traditional dish brimming with fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, onions, parsley, oil, and lemon. Good healthy Mediterranean diet. Even the baklavas are less gloopy. Open Monday to Saturday, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (12/04)*

Calypso Cafe 576 North Coast Highway 101, Leucadia, 760-632-8252. This "Calypso" has nothing to do with Caribbean music (or food), despite its tropical tiki-hut decor. The cuisine is French, ranging from old warhorses like onion soup and *coq au vin* to newfangled Gallo-Cal-Italian-Pacific Rim hyphenates. The traditional dishes are generally the most successful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. Although there's nothing revolutionary coming from this kitchen, the cooking is generally agreeable. Dinner nightly, reservations advised. Upper moderate. - N.W. (9/01)

Cuvee 2334 Carmel Valley Road, Del Mar, 858-259-5878. Seasonal California-Mediterranean cuisine, bolder and more complex than at the original, now-closed La Jolla branch. Cuisine is designed to accompany an interesting, affordable wine list. A reserve list includes fancier choices, still at minimal markups. Corkage fee for BYO is \$15, but waived on Tuesdays. Reservations urged. Lunch weekdays, dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Moderate. — *N.W.* (12/04)

El Callejon Restaurant Moonlight Plaza, 345 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-634-2793. This is a Mexican restaurant with a difference: Instead of the standard boring border foods and combo plates, it offers a long menu of genuine, zesty mainland dishes, some with original spins on tra-ditional themes. Shrimp *zarandeados* with a rich sauce of chilies and beef in cilantro sauce or chines and beer in cilantro sauce are some of the delights. There's even a *parrillada* (mixed grill) to serve two. The atmosphere offers more pleasures. At lunchtime, the dining room seems like a serene hacienda. Evenings the restaurant may turn into a rollicking community center, where multi-generational families and groups of friends fill the dining rooms and spill onto the sizable patio hidden in back. Mariachi band on Fridays and Satur-days. — N.W. (9/06)

Jamroc 101 101 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-436-3162. At this former site of D.B. Hacker's, you can still get great fish'n'chips - but the Brit batter now gets its lift from Ja-maica's Red Stripe beer, mon. The shack by the tracks now sports bright tropical designs on its back-patio walls, and the fare is casual Jamaican (plus a couple of Cajun dishes). Check out the bargain-priced samplers which include luscious soft-fried plantains and splendid patties (empanadas to you and me) with a choice of beef, curry chicken, or veggies. The spicing of the jerks and curry entrées are down-tuned to suit tourist tastes, but the table bottle of Walkerswood Scotch Bonnet Hot Sauce can kick that right up. Don't miss the fresh coconut water, served out of a young Thai coconut. Soca, ska, and (clean) reggae set the mood, and there's live steel pan weekend evenings. Beer, wine, Bigga soft drinks. Open Sunday through Wednesday until 8 p.m., Thursday through Saturday until 9 p.m. Inexpensive. - N.W. (4/05)

Knockout Pizza 2959 Carlsbad Boulevard, Carlsbad, 760-434-4468. It's New York pizza only here. They make the pies with traditional thin, crisp crusts and toppings like pepperoni, meatball, garlic, and "whitestone" (mozzarella, Parmesan, ricotta, garlic, and spinach). Maybe their best is the "Bronx Special," an assortment of pepperoni, sausage, onions, olives, mushrooms, pepper and garlic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (5/02)

Paul's Place 3671 Mission Avenue (at El Camino Real), Oceanside, 760-721-0124. This restaurant looks like a McDonald's or Wendy's (the building used to be a franchise) and the food comes fast, but it's no chain. The menu strikes a balance between American and Greek fare. The baked Greek half-chicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gyros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American three-egg breakfast specials with home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburgers, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkeyburger. Open seven days for lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/01)

Santa Fe BBQ Company 1505 Encinitas Boulevard, Encinitas, 760-632-5227. Santa Fe's exterior may look like a chain restaurant (the site used to be a Pat and Oscar's), but there's original food here — Texas-style barbecue, slowly smoked over green oak in a giant enclosed pit-smoker. It's not the North County's smokiest "Q" (nor the moistest, either), but it's good, especially the tender beef brisket and beef ribs with a pleasing red Texas-style sweet sauce. (Remember, Texans love cattle — not pigs so much — so the pork items are lesser lights.) Side dishes include good, clean coleslaw (not too sugary) and thick, meaty beans. Order at the counter, and they'll bring your food to you to eat inside, outside, or to take home. Child friendly, with video games and a kiddie menu. Sports fans can watch the game on large plasma both indoors and on the dining patio. Beer and wine available. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Easy parking. Moderate. — N.W. (8/06)

Tip Top Meats 6118 Paseo Del Norte, Carlsbad, 760-438-2620. This geranium-splashed blue-and-white Bavarian chalet is more than a butcher's shop. It's a combination butcher-deli-diner. Enter through the bulging deli and listen for the shouts and clatter of serving ladies. Look for the *"Es ist Wunderbar!"* sign over the counter. Try German and American dishes like Big John's all-you-can-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage. Owner Big John is a heavyweight Olympic boxer from the former East Germany with an M.A. in meat sciences. Generous portions abound. Friday through Sunday after 4 p.m., he roasts his famous prime rib dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00) Vigilucci's 505 South Coast Highway 101 (at D Street), Encinitas, 760-942-7332. In the Land of 10,000 Trattorias, this is one of the most pop-ular — and for good reason. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of

Italy," is actually acurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations include Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Pizzeria in Leucadia, and Vigilucci's Seafood and Steakhouse in Carlsbad. — N.W. (10/01)

NORTH INLAND

A Delight of France 126 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-746-2644. This authentic French bakery is one of the best in the region, offering daily baked authentic baguettes, brioches, quiches, and croissants, including a luscious almond croissant studded with nuts and laced with sweet almond paste. They claim to use all-organic ingredients, even the eggs, and locally grown produce. For a hearty breakfast, you can choose omelets, frittatas, French toast, and eggs. Lunch dishes include several savory tarts, a French deli plate, crèpes, salads, and sandwiches. And ooh la la, there are dessert pastries, too. Open for brunch/lunch and pre-dinner snacks Tuesday through Saturday; lunch/brunch only on Sunday. Inexpensive. — N.W. (5/05)

Bolsa Vietnamese Restaurant 9225 Mira Mesa Boulevard #118 (behind Wendy's), 858-693-3663. "The name 'Bolsa' isn't Vietnamese," says Kim Trang. "It's Spanish for 'bag." She's playing on words here: Trang once owned *Pho Bolsa* on University Avenue, and every Vietnamese knows *pho bo* is Vietnam's most popular quick meal, a beef rice noodle soup. At this location, Trang still makes excellent *pho bo*, but she has 122 other items as well, including fried catfish with ginger fish sauce, healthy (non-fried) Vietnamese spring rolls, or egg rolls with lettuce and mint in which to wrap them (sprinkled with *nuce man*, Vietnamese fish sauce). We're talking family-style cooking. Come once and Trang will remember you and everything you ate even if it was just *pho bo*. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (2/03)*

Golden Egg Omelet House 316 West Mission Avenue (at Escondido Boulevard), Escondido, 760-489-6420. This breakfast-lunch treasure-house is vast but cute, its brick walls and open beams festooned with knickknacks (all for sale). This is *the* place on Sunday mornings, when three generations bond over great, generous breakfasts. Omelets are perfect — light, thin crèpelike eggs wrapped around tall mounds of elaborate fillings. Thick waffles can be topped with fresh seasonal fruit. And then there are eggs, hash, crèpes, humongous burgers, and sandwiches. The potato casseroles, with a choice of a dozen fillings, are as huge in flavor as they are in size. Whatever you choose will carry you through until dinner. Reservations on weekends. In back of a mall. Easiest entry from Mission is at SDGE driveway; do not pass McDonald's. Good handicap access; sturdy high-chairs; low-salt cooking. Open daily, breakfast and lunch. Inexpensive. — *N.W. (9/03)*

Hunan 16719 Bernardo Center Drive, Rancho Bernardo, 858-487-8131. This casual family restaurant serves the cuisines of two spicy Chinese provinces, Szechuan and Hunan each with its own dedicated chef — but both chefs tone the spice way down to a suburban American comfort level. If you don't already know the difference between these neighboring cuisines, you're unlikely to learn them here. But you can have an enjoyable meal: Teasmoked duck, eggplant Hunan-style, and shredded potatoes with pickled vegetables are the outstanding dishes. If you're planning on a multicourse feast, order your meal a few dishes at a time or everything will be served at once; the staff is accommodating but limited-English. Over 20 vegan entrées. Full bar, Chinese beers, generic wines. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — N.W. (8/04)


Madras Cafe 9484 Black Mountain Road, Mira Mesa, 858-695-6229. In the same strip mall as Ashoka the Great, this family-friendly café features the savory vegetarian cuisine of South India. It's distinctly different from the standard North Indian menus, centering on numerous varieties of stuffed pancakes — from thin, crisp (and irresistible) crèpe-like *dosais* stuffed with vegetable curry to lacy rice-flour *aapams* drenched in coconut milk to hefty, frittata-like *uttapams*. (Try the latter with the delicious, not-too-spicy chile-onion stuffing.) Puffy *poori* bread and tamarind rice are spectacular. Order your dishes in the sequence you hope to eat them — that's usually how they come out of the kitchen. And don't expect hovering "Raj" - style service — it's just not the Tamil way. Seasoning is generally mild, to accommodate kiddies; spicy sauces are on the table. No alcohol. Open Tuesday through Sunday with buffet lunches and à la carte dinners. Inexpensive. — *N.W. (1/03)*

Pearl Chinese Cuisine 11666 Avena Place (at Webb Park), Rancho Bernardo, 858-487-3388. At Emerald Restaurant's younger, prettier subur-ban sister, you'll find modern Hong Kong-style Chinese cuisine, including both familiar and exotic dishes. Day-times are for dim sum (Chinese tapas), served daily until 3 p.m., plus champagne dim sum brunches on weekends. Along with standard items, the choices here leap to the latest Pacific creations, some rarely found this side of the ocean, including irresistible Shanghai soup dumplings. Dinners range from folk food to showy "gold cup" dishes. For a taste treat and visual hoot, try the sea bass with pine nuts, sculpted to resemble a dish sponge. International wine list at modest markups complements the cooking. Full bar. Frying done in salad (not peanut) oil. Reservations advised. Lunch and dinner on weekdays; three meals on weekends. Moderate, with some expensive spe-cialties. — N.W. (8/04)

A.R. Valentien The Lodge at Torrey Pines, 11480 N. Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-777-6635. A superb choice for a splurge: Chef Jeff Jackson cooks up a daily changing menu of California cuisine emphasizing the natural flavors of peak, in-season produce and topquality well-raised meats and wild seafood. Not only is the food delicious and quietly inventive, but it's relatively healthy, with less fat, salt, and "bad carbs" than at most restaurants. Note that all dishes on the "chef tasting" dinner are also available solo. The setting (a "country inn" on a golf course) is beautiful, the warren of dining rooms quiet and romantic unless packed. Validated valet parking, free self-parking; full bar with steeply priced wines, moderate-price cocktails. Reservations essential for weekend and holiday dinners. Open three meals daily. Very expensive. — N.W. (12/05)

Brockton Villa 1235 Coast Boulevard, La Jolla, 858-454-7393. Pretty and romantic, this sprawling cottage perches above La Jolla Cove and offers heated terraces as well as semi-enclosed tables indoors to admire the view. The culinary masterpiece is "Coast Toast," served until noon — the French toast of your happiest dreams, puffy and airy with a lovely orange flavor. (And the coffee is excellent.) Lunchtime features sandwiches on flavorful Bread & Cie breads while dinner runs to San Diego international-eclectic cookery that can be hit-or-miss. Affordable wines and

"The cheese trade is dead," says owner Phil Schutz, They still have all-cheese sandwiches with mixes of provolone, Monterev Jack, Cheddar, Swiss, Muenster, Danish Havarti, or Norwegian Jarls berg. But today this small, busy café is more famous for its "overstuffed" meat sandwiches. The leg of lamb, top round beef, and roast pork loin are all spitroasted right beside you as you walk in to waken your taste buds. Cheeses like crumbled Greek Mizithra add tang to the taste. If you're into salami and ham, try the foot-long. Inexpensive. Other location: 427 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-232-2303, open daily breakfast to late lunch, with delivery to downtown addresses. — *E.B.* (10/01)

Come On In! 1030-B Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-551-1063. (Also at 10184 Telesis Court, Sorrento Valley 858-558-8964; and 11455 El Camino Real, Carmel Valley, 858-350-2700.) Clunky name, but suave Euro-bistro feel with outside tables under trees. This is your escape to "Paree" anytime vou can afford La Jolla. Actually, they keep the price of breakfasts - like two "plain and simple" steamed eggs with fresh fruit and toast, or the "Popeye" omelet, with spinach, Parmesan cheese prosciutto ham, and diced tomato, fruit, and toast - down to a small roar. Of course, everybody in this neck of the woods is trying *not* to eat, so expect lots of fruit plates and healthy lunch sandwiches like roasted eggplant with zucchini, bell peppers, tomatoes, and mozzarella. Open daily, weekends to 8 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate; dinners a little more expensive. -E.B. (4/03)

Donovan's Steak and Chop **House** 4340 La Jolla Village Drive, Golden Triangle, 858-450-6666. At this excellent traditional steakhouse, the menu includes a variety of appetizers, among them a cocktail of giant shrimp with a spicy, tomatoey sauce and a large, lightly sautéed crab cake with house-made tartar sauce. The wet-aged prime beefsteaks are seasoned with sea salt and pepper and cooked on a gas grill precisely to your order. Bleu cheese, béarnaise, and peppercorn sauces are available at extra charge. Non-beef entrées include fish, seafood, veal chop, pork chop, or a delicate Aus-tralian rack of lamb. Unlike many steakhouses where your money buys only the meat, entrées are served with vegetables and potato. Additional à la carte sides include creamed spinach and sautéed mushrooms. Among the house-made desserts the highlights are a light, creamy cheesecake with fresh strawberry sauce and a traditional creme brûlée. The service is attentive, friendly, and knowledgeable, in a mas culine setting with dark wood-panel-ing, dim lighting, and only a moderate noise level. Cigar room off the bar Open Monday through Saturday. Very expensive. - N.W. (9/02)

Harry's Coffee Shop 7545 Girard Avenue (at Pearl), La Jolla 858-454-7381. When Harry Rudolph II opened Harry's back in 1960, his idea was simple: to create a down-home eatery and soda fountain where all La Jolla — rich, poor, Brahmins, and gar-deners) — could mix and meet with plenty of good eats. Everyone from Joan Kroc to Junior Seau to Brooke Shields has been spotted here, along with regular folks who've been coming in for three decades. Now Harry III reigns quietly among a dozen whirling dervish waitresses at lunch. The big ham steak and eggs is a favorite breakfast, as is the simple, rich "Hot Creamy Oatmeal" with strawberries. Pecan pancakes and thin, crisp waffles ring true to many Easterners (though Harry offers thick Belgian-style waffles, too) and for lunch, turkey burgers and the bacon-loaded British Burger are pop-ular. At the counter, the banter between been-here-forever waitresses and customers sounds like family life. Nice sidewalk patio, too. Breakfast and lunch daily. Long lines on weekends Inexpensive. — E.B. La Jolla Brew House 7536 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-6279. Don't expect to see the beach. Do expect to taste some good beers made right here and good solid food, such as the prime rib sandwich (which goes great with their Irish Stout) or the roasted potato. Or maybe best of all, the buffalo burger big, hefty, and low on cholesterol. You'd call this a family, multi-generational sports bar eatery. Nice mix. It's La Jolla, so it's not dirt cheap, but the guys here seem really interested in making interesting brews and good food to accompany them. Open for dinner seven days; lunch and dinner weekends. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (1/04)*

Marrakesh 634 Pearl Street (at Draper), La Jolla, 858-454-2500. The North African fare of Morocco is like no other in the world — influenced by Arab cuisines, but more intense and sheerly hedonistic. At this Moroccan restaurant, the fare is arranged into a nightly five-course prix fixe feast, with superb lentil soup (*harira*), a salad plate, *bastilla* (a chicken-filled filo pie), an entrée, and finally mint tea poured from on high to accompany almond baklava perfumed with orange-flower water. The setting and service are dramatic - tented ceilings, low banquette seating at carved round tables, bellydancing interludes, servers in fezzes (You're the Sheik of Araby.) A short list of entrées (a maximum of two choices per table, to be shared) features fine chicken (or lamb) with olives and preserved lemons; moist, fatless duck; lamb with couscous; and rather dry fish. You can request the dreamy lamb with honey, an extravaganza that includes fruits, almonds, sesame, and cin-namon. Lunch and dinner daily; reserve for weekends. Moderate. — N.W. (4/01)

Trattoria Acqua 1298 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-0709. This popular restaurant has charming decor, with arched doorways dividing a warren of white-painted, high-ceilinged rooms and terraces arranged around a tiled, heated courtyard. The seasonally changing menu could be called "avantgarde Italian," a style that more than pushes the Italian envelope with as-



sorted international influences. The food can be divine — or dismaying. Given Acqua's "destination restaurant" status, there's a surprising air of beancounting that manifests itself in oddly lightweight silverware, waiters unclear about proper wine service, and, at times, tired veggies. Desserts, though, are superb. Full bar with extensive, wide-ranging wine list that includes half bottles as well as choices by the glass. Walk-ins accepted but weekend reservations advised. Restaurant is two floors down from Prospect, with validated parking in underground garage on Coast Boulevard. Elevator access from both directions (Acqua's stop is the first floor). Lunch or brunch and dinner seven days. Moderate (pastas) to very expensive. — N.W. (11/04)



Aladdin's Cafe 5420 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-573-0000; Uptown Shopping Center, 1220 Cleveland Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-574-1111. These cafés offer a bright, clean atmosphere for bright and clean, if rather generic, Middle Eastern favorites (hummus, tabbouleh, kebabs, *shawerma*, etc.), plus imaginative Levantine-flavored pizzas and salads. There are ample choices for vegetarians. Both locations offer beer and wine. Hillcrest's owners offer a more Lebanese cuisine. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

Bale French Sandwich Shop 4879 University Avenue (at 49th Street), City Heights, 619-283-4352. Ann Nguyen started this back in 1980, and her prices haven't changed — they're incredibly low. But the taste of her sandwiches is up there in French-Vietnamese heaven. The Vietnamese are special at this: they do French better than the French — with some spicy Asian touches. The BBQ Pork French sandwich delivers the immediate taste of cilantro, garlicky mayonnaise, sweet barbecue sauce, carrots, onions, cucumber, and lashings of sliced pork, with the occasional heat of a green jalapeño. But above all, it's that crunch of bread — fresh, feathery, and very French — that makes this hard to beat. Add dessert of homemade banana shrimp cake and — *wilal* Open daily, breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/02)

China Max 4698 Convoy Street (at Engineer), Kearny Mesa, 858-650-3333. The decor is plain and bright, the sound level loud, but this is a major resource for authentic Hong Kong cooking — creative and multiregional, filtered through the refined wizardry of the genuine Cantonese style. The seafood aswim in the live tanks includes such delicacies as black cod (bony but wonderfully sweet), Dungeness crab, and (if you've got the money) abalone — but even inexpensive, homey dishes (e.g., wonton soup, crabmeat cakes) sing with flavor. Call ahead for reservations to avoid a wait at the door. A Pan-Asian community throngs here, for good reason. Lunch weekdays, dinner seven days. Inexpensive to exorbitant but mainly moderate. — N.W. (1/04)

Dumpling Inn 4619 Convoy Street #F, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-9638. Holein-the-wall? Yes. But what a hole-inthe-wall. For those who love the Far East and its food, finding the Dumpling Inn is a little revelation. It's located in the busy Jasmine/Korean Market Center among Oriental herbalists, mansize-vase shops, even feng shui experts.

The Inn itself is tiny but charming. Long hanging lanterns, decorative strings of scarlet and gold firecrackers, Chinese flutes, and even the odd conical straw hat. The food is serious but not expensive. Dishes like ten fish and green chive dumplings, spicy stir-fried three-ingredient lo mein (thick noodles, jumbo shrimp, calamari, and chicken plus hot red peppers) are challenging and exciting, as is the Dumpling Dinner (including hot-andsour soup, cold cuts, shredded pork bun, pot-stickers, shrimp and pork dumplings). Don't miss their divine jel-lyfish salad — crunchy-tender, bright and spicy (but not too) — you'd be hard-pressed to find its like outside of Hong Kong. Open 11 a.m. to 8:30 p.m., closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/02)

East Buffet 8998 Miramar Road, Miramar, 858-566-1888. Curly-haired stone lions greet you outside one of the grander dining halls in the county. "The biggest buffet of San Diego" claims the menu, with "over 200 items daily." Start at the Mongolian grill. Pick your raw prawns, chicken, pork, beef, *satays*, and hand the plate-load to the Iron Chef. He'll stir-cook them on the hotplate for you. You'll need hiking boots to cover the endless rows of steaming chafing dishes. Must-eat: the fresh sashimi, like salmon and tuna mouth-wateringly scrumptious. And try the chicken feet (they taste a bit like cow tongue, or brains). Open daily, brunch through dinner. Inexpensive, – E.B. (4/05)

IKEA Restaurant & Cafe 2149 Fenton Parkway, Mission Valley, 619-283-6166, ext.1200. Central shrine for San Diego's 10,000 Swedes, so they say. They come to taste open-faced sandwiches, salmon, shrimp, and meatballs again. This restaurant inside Sweden's wildly successful "home interi-ors" chain is a great intro to Swedish tastes. The food's more sensible than

exciting, of course. But healthy — beef and pork for the meatballs are guaranteed hormone-free You eat the meatballs with Swedish lingonberry (not cranberry) sauce. Seafood is big: the shrimp open-faced sandwich, the salmon plate with potatoes and broc-coli, and the Gravad Lox Plate (cured salmon) are always on. And if you want to be disgustingly healthy, chew on their fresh vegetable plate (raw carrot sticks, cauliflower, garbanzo beans, and mushrooms). All for a song. The only health hazard: hordes of babies and kids romping in the restaurant's mother-friendly play area. Inexpensive. -E.B.(5/02)

Lightnin' Jacks BBQ Clairemont Fown Square, 4705-H Clairemont Drive (near movieplex), Clairemont 858-270-8227. Clean, cute, and a little self-conscious, this barbecue has blackand-white Western pictures on the walls and some seating on barstools with metal "saddles" (more comfortable than they look). The barbecue mechanism is a Texas-style pit smoker burning sweet hickory. The meats that emerge from it aren't the smokiest, but they're tasty enough. Pork ribs are tender and moist, and beef brisket carries enough smoke flavor to pass muster in Texas; other meat choices are less successful. The tomatoey sauce is pleasant but ordinary. A fried catfish plate makes a flavorful alternative (but be-ware the cat sandwich, awash in hot sauce). Hush puppies and sweet potato fries are the most savory sides. Check your take-out bag to make sure you're getting what you ordered, as youthful staff is easily flustered. Kiddie plates available. Draft beer and wine available. Open daily, lunch and dinner. In-expensive to moderate. — N.W. (1/05)

Seoul B.B.Q. 4344 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-505-8700. This Ko rean restaurant means sitting before a sizzling cast-iron grill, sipping hot sake, the smell of grilled beef, grilled onions, and fresh garlic in the air. Try the "Ko-rean B.B.Q." marinated short ribs (*tong galbi*) or thick marbled slices of sirloin (beef *gui*). You'll enjoy all the accompanying dishes that make the meal, like crunchy seaweed salads, radishes in garlicky tomato sauce, slow-cooked

potatoes with soy sauce and jalapeño pepper. Feeling adventurous? Go for the goat meat hot pot or Korean steak tartare (*yukhwoe*). This is sensual, elemental, hairy-chested food. Lunch and dinner six days, closed Sunday. ---M.N. (12/99)

Sunrise Buffet 3860 Convoy #121, Kearny Mesa, 858-715-1608, "Ovsters are here!" It's what everyone here waits for. Apart from the usual array of meats, fish, shellfish, and novelties like stuffed mushrooms, stuffed clams, dragon rolls (cucumber, avocado, asparagus), and *mochi* (sticky rice cake), these plates of raw oysters in their big shells are one of the big draws. This buffet restaurant is smaller than many, but it still looks like a mega-McDonald's eating barn inside, except for a sky-blue-lit ceiling recess "heaven." Like McDonald's, it attracts lots of families, maybe because it's not just allyou-can-eat, but all-you-can-drink, too included in the price. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. E.B. (4/05)

Tropical Star 6163 Balboa Avenue, Clairemont, 858-874-7827. A modest café and grocery offers Puerto Rican and Latin American food and groceries. Very modest surroundings; good au-thentic inexpensive food. Same menu all day Monday through Saturday; closed Sunday. Inexpensive. E.W. (8/99)

THE BEACHES

Bare Back Grill 4640 Mission Boulevard (at Emerald), Pacific Beach, 858-274-7117. This may be the first New Zealand food place in town, but that's not what keeps the customers coming in. It's BBG's claim that most of their meat is certified organic. The owners guarantee hormone-free beef and lamb, both from from New Zealand. So, what to eat? Burgers, burgers, burgers — all kinds — from prime NZ An-gus to "Bare Li'l Lamb" burgers with wasabi dip. They also offer chicken. Decor inside is strictly Kiwiland, from the all-black rugby shirt on the wall to the declaration of food principles. Peo-

ple who had given up on hormonetreated meat are coming here for their first burger in years. Open seven days, 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/05)

C-Level 880 Harbor Island Drive, Harbor Island, 619-298-6802, California-Mediterranean comfort food with a Southern "Low Country" accent from Chef Deborah Scott; same menu lunch and dinner. Alas, the restaurant's name also gives away its grade — the food's okay but not spectacular, although the gorgeous heated patio at the edge of the bay does plenty to sweeten the pot. Your visiting aunt will swoon over the view and enjoy the food. Vast wine list with plenty by the glass, wide range of prices but some steep markups; good beer list. Full bar with creative cocktails. Ample free parking. No reservations except for large parties. Open daily, lunch and din-ner. Moderate to expensive.—> — N.W. (5/06)

Fairouz Cafe And Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Loma Portal, 619-225-0308. Seek out this familyowned-and-operated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at w cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate - EW

Great Moon Buffet 1840 Garnet Avenue (Pacific Plaza 2 shopping cen-ter), Pacific Beach, 858-273-6868. This is one of the classier Chinese all-voucan-eat buffets in town. They boast a glittering chandelier hanging in the oc-tagonal entrance, plus "over 150 items daily." Certainly they have great surf-nturf, like prime rib and jumbo shrimp or mayonnaise mussels. Or Japanese charcoal-grilled eel with sesame seeds on rice (unagi-zushi). It tastes salty vet caramel-y too. Eel-icious. Or Chinese baked crab meat on crab shell. Add crab legs, and maybe some roast duck. Cramming? Feast today, fast tomorrow. Dessert fruits include loquats, pineapple, peach, longan. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (4/05) Karinva Thai & Vegetarian Cuisine 4475 Mission Boulevard (Sea-Coast Square), Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie *The Beach,* with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes getting off on the coconut curries like gang ped, panang, and kang kari. Or noodle dishes like the famous pad thai. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai origins. The *tom yum kung* (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table, the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course nam pla, Thai fish sauce. A nice coun terpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: d talay, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured inÖ The Beach. Ranchos Cocina 1830 Sunset Cliffs Boulevard, Ocean Beach, 619-226-7619. Also at 3910 30th Street (at University Avenue), North Park, 619-574-1288. At both locations of this delightful mini-chain you'll find healthy, creative Mexican and vegetar-ian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak - in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. Try, even, an antojito stuffed with beef — it's stewed, not ground. And sample something with the house made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, try ... anything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Rum Jungle adds granola, banana, strawberries, blueberries, mango pieces, and honey to make a surprisingly filling breakfast. Of course this bright little place has lots of other smoothies, too, along with sandwiches. But the *açaí* power fruit bowl is what keeps them coming back. Open until 6 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/04)

Sportsmen's Seafoods 1617 Quivira Road, Mission Beach, 619-224-3551. Fifty years ago this restaurant-fish market was a tuna cannery, part of San Diego's late-lamented fishing industry. The same Sicilian familv still owns it, and still knows everything about fish and how to cook it. The menu is devoted to the "fruits of the sea" and includes a wonderful seafood platter (shrimp, squid, clams, fish, fries, and salad). And, of course, a crispy-crunchy fish-and-chips platter. Eat outside on deck, contemplating the small ships on the bay. They buy seasonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their attached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fisher-men. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/00)

World Famous 711 Pacific Beach Drive, Pacific Beach, 858-272-3100. World Famous is as on-the-beach as it gets, right on PB's boardwalk. It has a covered porch, a side-slung patio, and low-slung ceilings, so everything feels intimate. You sit at varnished inlaid wooden tables with lots of diagonal timbering and sexy blue lighting. It's often crowded and noisy. Who's gonna be picky here? You, when you're paying twenty-some bucks for a steak. On the other hand, the prime rib, surf-n-turf, and tournedos will fill you fine. If you want to beat the big prices, try the beach burger or a seared ahi Caesar salad. The view is free. Breakfast and lunch inexpensive; dinners moderate to expensive. Open daily. — E.B. (1/04)

The food he serves at Batter Up! is less ambitious (so far) but talent will tell. The food at this friendly, casual sports bar (about ten minutes from Petco via the 94) may be "pub grub," but the cooking is serious. Fried fish, fried shrimp, thick sandwiches, and juicy Certified Angus burgers with creative dressings are well above the norm. Free parking in large lot patrolled by security guards. First timers should request sauces (especially the house hot sauce) on the side until you know whether you like them. Fairly noisy inside (depending on what's on TV); quiet patio outside. Beer and wine license pending. Open daily, lunch and dinner, with early closing Sundays. Inexpensive. — N.W. (6/06)

Elaine's Coffee Shoppe 1212 South 43rd Street, Southcrest, 619-264-6525. When Su Cha Yang took over Elaine's a quarter century ago, this was one tough part of town No problem. Su had survived the Korean war and Vietnam before she came here. Now, with Southcrest looking up she is famous for her fun and her food. Most customers are regulars - judges ministers, teachers among them — and they don't want change. So Elaine's remains a bright, genuine 1970s-style breakfast-all-day coffee shop. Breakfast: try the ham, bacon, mushroom "Hunter" omelet. Lunch: the pork chop plate is a great filler. Su Cha Yang also cooks dishes for vegetarian, Muslim, and Korean customers. Breakfast and lunch six days; closed Tuesdays. — E.B. (5/06)

Hawthorn's Restaurant Stephen and Mary Birch North Park Theatre, 2895 University (near 29th Street), North Park, 619-544-0940 When this long-standing Banker's Hill restaurant moved to spiffy (if quite noisy) new digs here, the change proved positive in every way. Menu choices are now fewer but better, with superior ingredients including varied and seasonal locally grown vegetables matched to the individual entrées. The kitchen now does more from scratch, and you can taste all these improvements on the plate. The fare is Mediterranean-American with Mexican touches. Most desserts outsourced. Wide-ranging wine list, full bar, corkage a reasonable \$15. Reservations recommended, especially weekends. Expensive. on N.W. (8/06)

Heaven Sent Desserts 3001 University Avenue (at 30th Street, across from Union Bank), North Park, 619-793-4758. The developing district around the North Park Theatre desperately needed a bakery, and Heaven Sent arrived. They produce a full range

of desserts, from breakfast pastries to cookies, tarts, pies, custards, and on through fancy cakes (the Tres Leches is especially good). The style is midwestern American, solid rather than ethereal. To drink: coffee, espresso, teas, hot chocolate, Italian sodas, and fruit juice. Open daily breakfast until afterdinner, past 11 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays.—> — N.W. (6/06)

Jyoti-Bihanga 3351 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-282-4116. Oh sure, you'll be watching Sri Chinmoy, the Bengali guru, on TV juggling, declaring Geneva International Airport a "Peace Blossom," or boarding his Italian *"Treno della Pace."* Plus, his books, his portraits, his paintings, and his chant-songs surround you. Apart from that, not only is this heavenly blue-domed restaurant run by his stu dents peaceful, but the fresher-thanfresh Bengali-tinged health food is de-licious. Their chutney-topped "Neatloaf" bursts with nutty, intriguing flavors. Even the accompanying mashed potato and gravy tastes different. Also delish: Brahma Burrito, "In-finite Blue" (interesting brown rice salad with bleu cheese dressing), and the Shiva Wrap (tofu and fresh veggies with a well-integrated curry flavor). On cold days, start with a steaming sweet pea soup. Monday through Saturday lunch and dinner (no dinner Wednesday); Sunday occasional brunch only. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/01)

Kensington Grill 4055 Adams Avenue, Kensington, 619-281-4014. This spiffy spot in an old, staid neighborhood proves change can be good, delivering intelligent, inventive cuisine. Preparations follow the convention of contrasts in sophisticated cuisine sweet vs. salty, soft vs. crunchy, hot vs. cold. Kensington Grill proves a talented, hardworking kitchen. Open for dinner nightly. Moderate. — *M.N. (8/99)*

Phuong Trang Vietnamese Seafood Restaurant 4170 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6750. Tired of putting up with the crowds at the popular Convoy Street restaurant? Go east, where you'll find the same menu without the hassles. The fare centers on Vietnamese "people's food" emphasizing numerous genres of noodle soups, but there are a handful of more elegant house specialties — including the extraordinary "Special Sauce" Dungeness crab from the live tank. (The sauce is tangy tamarind.) Call ahead to order steamed or grilled live-tank catfish. Reservations and credit cards accepted, both branches. Vietnamese beers including "33"; just two generic wines. Also bring a pad and write down the numbers of your orders to give the waiter, as staffers speak little English. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate (higher for live-tank seafood). — N.W. (3/04)

Zensei 3396 30th Street (at Upas), North Park, 619-546-6171. This muchwelcomed neighborhood restaurant in a restaurant-starved neighborhood of fers a changing menu of sushi, fusion appetizers, and Japanese entrées emphasizing noodle dishes. The sushi is the main draw. It's well made and based on seafood from the same fishmonger used by Ota and Nobu. The "party rolls" (such as "stuffed tomato" and "honeymooners") may not be original, but they're delicious fun. Free parking behind restaurant (enter by alley on Upas east of Jack in the Box lot). Reservations advised for Friday/Saturday evenings, accepted for two or more at sushi bar, four or more at tables. Japanese and American beers, sakes, and wines. Lunch and dinner daily. — N.W. (1/05)

EAST COUNTY & COLLEGE AREA

Cafe Zia 6686 El Cajon Boulevard (at Montezuma), College Area, 619-337-3937. South Asia meets Mexico! Khaled Zia had the brilliant idea of combining wraps with chicken and South Asia's great gift to the world: chutney — mango chutney, papaya chutney, peach, apple, even a serrano chili pepper chutney. The combo works with them all. As soon as you smell the chicken strips hissing away on the grills, you're hooked. Then when they come smothered in peach or mango chutney, or cooling yogurt, along with sweetsauced potatoes, what can you do? Do as half of San Diego State does: just say yes. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B. (12/01)*

Chef Taka 7520 El Caion Boulevard (at Parks), Mesa Plaza, La Mesa, 619-463-0231. This is indeed the same chef Satate Taka who co-founded Taka in the Gaslamp, and then Octopus Gar-den. In July 2003 he moved his kitchen to La Mesa where he now cooks his inventive Japanese-based fusion cuisine with French, Mexican, and Chinese touches. Try the dreamy soft-shell crab with "salsa cream aioli," the tender tempura, or the traditional Teishoku dinner. Taka generally presides at the sushi bar. The staff is small so for the best cooking and service, dine on a weeknight and make an evening of it – weekends can be hectic. For a bubbly treat try chilled Nigori (unfiltered) sake, served in the traditional manner in an overflowing square wooden cup. Open six days for dinner; closed Monday. Happy hour bargains nightly; regular prices moderate to expensive. N.W. (3/04)

Downtown Cafe 182 East Main Street, El Cajon, 619-440-5687. Sur-prise! Not far from Magnolia and Main, a French-style sidewalk café. The successful "Por Favor" eateries' owner launched this as a kind of Mexican patio restaurant, but serving gringo food. And it works, maybe because of reasonable prices for baby-back pork ribs, giant burritos, or Louisiana Chicken strips. Or even the veggie burger. But it's partly where you dine: out on the patio. The place has lots of ancient doors and wrought iron-and wood window frames, laced with creepers. Inside is a beautiful long bar with a counter on the street and chess sets so you can play and watch the world go by. Lunch and dinner daily Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/03) Tyler's Taste of Texas 576 North

Tyler's Taste of Texas 576 North Second Street, El Cajon, 619-444-9295. Unfussy home cooking. Some dishes outshine others. The slab of smoky ham steak that comes with the first-rate breakfast is in itself enough to rouse the sleepiest appetite. Expertly sautéed onions and mushrooms lend flavor to fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebbly-smooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character. For lunch and dinner, the Texas menu features Texasstyle barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and sausage) that's sufficiently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. The barbecue beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. Pleasant surprises: a substantial, peppery cornmeal crust on the tender catfish and the fried green tomatoes, and the rich stock in the vegetable soup. All-you-can-eat catfish Wednesdays and Fridays. Open 24 hours. Inexpensive to low moderate. -A.M. (2/02)

FAR EAST

Alpine Inn 2225 Alpine Boulevard, Alpine, 619-445-5172. Beef lover's heaven. Also, try the house special, the Texas burger, ground in-house and served on a Kaiser roll with steak fries. Dark interior with large booths. Very crowded for dinner on Sunday. Lunch and dinner (with inexpensive earlybird dinner) Monday through Saturday; brunch and dinner Sunday. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.*

Pablito's of the Desert 590 Palm Canyon Drive (in The Center, #8), Bor-rego Springs, 760-767-5753. Pablito's claims "Authentic Mexican Cuisine, patio dining, and great tequila mar-garitas." Well, the gorgeous patio is open when the weather is favorable, and the cuisine runs to gringo favorites in the Mexican mode (lots of combo platters), but the flavors are honest and pleasing. The most authentic dishes come from the "Specialties" section of the menu, including a good *chile verde* (pork in green chile sauce), numerous varieties of enchiladas, and several flavors of chilaquiles. Full bar, including sangria, margaritas, Mexican beers. Closed in the summer; other seasons, open for lunch and dinner (with a break between), Wednesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to low moderate. - N.W. (4/03)

Ramon's Smokehouse BBQ 1730 Alpine Boulevard, Suite 110, Alpine, 619-445-1008. The smell of mesquite wood burning under fresh-cut beef rib is beyond resistance. The secret Texas recipe draws crowds. Go Sunday morning, especially, when chefs in maroon aprons dance around the fat-spitting fire, disappearing into the clouds of fragrant smoke to flip the racks of beef and pork ribs. In good weather you can eat out back next to an authentic chuck wagon. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (11/00)

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

Bamboo Bistro 3882 Fourth Avenue (at University), Hillcrest, 619-299-9727. How many American chefs do you know who actually went to Asia and learned by working in tra-ditional restaurant kitchens of Vietnam, Indonesia, India? Chef Alexandria did. The result is her Asian Fusion Cuisine. The Bistro is huddled in the corner of a strip mall, but you can still eat under exotic umbrella lampshades (inside) or tropical palapas (outside). The food is fresh, original, and often tasty. Dishes to try include Chinese Chopstick salad (shredded chicken, fried rice noodles, mandarin oranges, toasted almonds). Indo-Chinese burrito with steak (beef, rice noodles covered with a sesame and lime sauce), Drunken Noodles (chicken, steak shrimp, salmon, or tofu), and Sea Salad (glass noodles, wild salmon, greens). Lunch and dinner six days, closed Sundays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (12/05)

Brians' American Eatery 1451 Washington Street (near Lincoln), Hillcrest, 619-296-8268. Also at 828 Sixth Avenue, Gaslamp. Note the apostrophe: Not one but two Brians have taken over what had been Topsy's, a venerable coffeehouse/eatery for 40 years. They've done a good job of cleaning it up without gutting the fifties roadhouse character. It's open all night on weekends, and late night is quite a scene. But for a lot of people, breakfast is the thing. The Brians' eight-ounce charbroiled top sirloin steak with eggs and country potatoes is a great Saturday morning treat. Or the "Hey Ricky!!!," an omelet with chorizo, avocado, green chilies, onions, and cheeses. Or ask for their off-menu breakfast special — it's al-ways cheaper. Another good thing: coffee comes by the thermos-full. Three meals until 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday; open 24 hours from early Friday morning until Sunday evening. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (10/02) Celadon Royalty Thai Restau-

rant 540 University Avenue (near Sixth), Hillcrest, 619-297-8424. The menu was originally devised by a chef who cooked for the Siamese royal family. Some dishes taste luxurious, and all the dishes taste authentic — and carefully prepared. The regular entrées of fer a choice of sauces (red curry, green curry, etc.) with your choice of protein, but go straight to the Chef's Specialty items on the menu to find the best and ararest. Stuffed chicken wings are extraordinary, seafood soup *talay* is fabulous, and among the entrées, don't miss *choe chee duck* or the Queen of Thailand's favorite, pineapple fried rice. Lunch Monday through Friday, dinner nightly. — *N.W.* (5/05)

City Delicatessen 535 University Avenue (at Sixth), Hillcrest, 619-295-2747. Some folk come for the Jewish food (chicken-in-the-pot, brisket of beef, chopped liver), others to soak in the art-deco colors — the cornucopia of fruit above the entrance, the mustard yellow walls, the black-and-white checker tile, or the flower bunches of red, blue, green, and yellow lamps. And then some come for both: the stuffed cabbage roll (with ground beef and rice inside) is a glowering red ball with maroon, oniony, sweet-andsour raisin sauce to die for, set off by green parsley and bright orange slices. Scandalously delicious. Downside? Our pastrami sandwich tasted dry and chewy by comparison. But City Deli is less strictly Jewish (they have bacon on their breakfast menu) and more of an everyday New York-style eatery. Wait staff are good-humored, and the See-burg Wall-o-Matic tableside jukeboxes actually work. Bring plenty of quarters. Breakfast all day; early-bird dinner specials; late-night dining. Open from 7 a.m. till midnight; until 2 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B. (5/03)

European Market & Deli 4135 Park Boulevard (north of El Cajon Boulevard), Hillcrest, 619-298-8661. Basically a Greek deli, but charming, especially if you're into patios. Inside has painted grapes, hanging copper pans, and framed pictures of Paris cafés. The most popular dish is the lemon-roasted chicken, but if you love lamb, Paul's Special, with potatoes, salad, and pita — Fridays and Saturdays only — is the way to go. (They do offer lamb sandwiches daily.) Other good dishes include the Veggie Diabolou pita sandwich (hot and spicy), the ground beef moussaka plate (eggplant, potatoes, and béchamel sauce), Greek chicken soup and, of course, gyros. But go just to play bon vivant on the patio. Open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday, till 5:30 p.m. Saturday. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (1/05)

Hong Kong Restaurant 3871 Fourth Avenue (at University), Hill-crest, 619-291-9449. Where to get a good Chinese meal after midnight? This restaurant (next to Column One's statues and fountain shop) serves meals till 2:30 a.m. Inside is typical Asian decor, including black-and-white Chinese brush paintings and carved cherry wood chairs. Their huge menu offers traditional Szechwan and Mandarin fare. The fried, pork-filled wontons on raw cabbage are delish, especially splot-ted with fiery Chinese mustard. The Singapore Style Rice Noodles (not often featured in Chinese restaurants) are tanged with curry, and excellent, as is the Kung Pao chicken. Also look at egg drop soup, pork chow mein, shrimp with lobster sauce, and scallion ginger chicken. Service is super quick. Lunch and dinner, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (11/05)

Kemo Sabe 3958 Fifth Avenue (off University Avenue), Hillcrest, 619-220-6802. Audacity is Chef Deborah Scott's culinary signature. In her cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touches and towering heaps of garnishes. All the edible frou-frou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive *chipotle* cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a *picante* marinade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the house style — sky-high, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Dinner served daily. Reservations strongly advised. Prices moderate. — N.W. (11/00)

La Posta de Acapulco's Taco Shop 3980 Third Avenue (at Washington), Hillcrest, 619-295-8982. (Also in Lakeside and Spring Valley.) People have been coming to this orange-andwhite drive-through-without-cars for 20 years. One of the main reasons is the *carne asada* burritos. Rich-tasting, fresh, generous. Folks sit around the outside benches right next to Washington Street, oblivious to the traffic. Also much loved here are the *chile verde* and the quesadilla with *carne asada*. For breakfast, think chorizo burrito. And for value, just to fill you up, you can't beat the bean tostada. You can drink *horchata*, a rice drink, or *jamaica*, mate from hibiscus flower, to complete the picture. Open 24 hours in Hillcrest. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (*1/04*)

Phil's BBQ 4030 Goldfinch Street, Mission Hills, 619-688-0559. Check the lines around Phil's any lunchtime. Although Phil grills his BBQ (rather than slow-smoking it), he must be doing something right. He is: That sweet, rich rib sauce he invented is one thing. The fall-off-the-bone pork and beef is another. The sweet baked beans a third. Plus, the restaurant is a rabbit-warren that grew, but it's kid-friendly, has open wash-basins for your greasy mitis, and has paper towel rolls at every table. Ribs can be expensive, but a quarter-rib (four bones) will fill you fine. A great second-best is the BBQ sandwich with char-grilled pork shoulder. Remember: you'll get pork unless you specify beef. Open for lunch and dinner; closed Monday. New location at 3750 Sports Arena Boulevard, Sports Arena, 619-226-6333. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B. (3/06)*



Saigon on Fifth 3900 Fifth Avenue Hillcrest. University), 619-220-8828. This is the rare local Vietnamese restaurant that emphasizes the urban, French-influenced cuisine of colonial-era Saigon and Hué, rather than the ubiquitous *pho* noodle soups of the North. The list of house specialties includes many entrées you won't find elsewhere in San Diego, among them a smoked oyster omelet and a unique version of coconut shrimp served in the coconut shell. Many dishes here include honey, so the Boon (spicy noodle salad) deserves its name - a refreshing break from the sweetness. Well-chosen, reasonable wine list suits the food, as does the serene decor. Validated underground parking just north of the bank. Open daily, lunch and dinner until midnight. Low moderate. - N.W. (6/06)

Sausage King 811 W. Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-297-4301. Not too many delicatessens in the county still make their own sausages, luncheon meats, and jerky. But the German couple who runs this place does. They make an unbelievable 34 different sausages and luncheon meats plus 10 different smoked meats like . turkey, beef, Westphalian ham, Black Forest ham, and even bacon. For lunch they will make you a really cheap bun-sandwich filled with anything from home-made liverwurst to blood sausages to salami. Two would really fill you up. As with the nearby cheese shop (see Venissimo), the Starbucks at Falcon and Washington is a good place to chow down this unique sausage experience. Open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tues-day through Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/06)

Taste of Szechuan 670 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-291-1668. Friendly staff serves up standard Szechuan Mandarin fare at this archetypical Chinese restaurant. Szechuan Garlic Shrimp is number one on the list of twelve House Specialties for good reason. This tangy dish of crispy, deep-fried shrimp is one of their best. Not often seen on the menus of strip mall Chinese restaurants, the Szechuan Orange Fish is also recommended, but don't be misled by the "hot & spicy" star next to this item. As with any of their "spicy" offerings, the heat in this dish barely registers. Spice lovers should ask for an extra kick. The Toffee Banana and Toffee Apple desserts may tempt you, but unless you have a dentist on-call, it's best to pass on these super-sticky sweets. Inexpensive lunch specials. Open late until midnight Monday through Thursday, until 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday, and until 10 p.m. on Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *B.D.* (6/05)

Venissimo Cheese 754 W. Wash ington, Mission Hills, 619-491-0708. Just don't ask for Velveeta here. Everything else, they've got: sixty-plus vari-eties of cheese, most from Europe. But a meal? Yes. You can get a baguettestyle sandwich stuffed with cow cheese, sheep cheese, goat cheese, fruity, moldy, runny, stinky, any cheese in the house, same price, around five bucks. Even *Boschetto* cheese, with truffles in it, which sells at around \$30 per pound, or Napoleon's favorite, stinky Epousses Berthaut, or the beautifully tangy *Schloss.* Plus you get grapes or a pear to go with the sandwich. Where to eat it? Starbucks, a few doors down, usually doesn't mind. Coffee, bread, interesting cheese, fruit — it's the perfect combo. Open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B. (5/06)

DOWNTOWN

Alambres Mexican Grill 756 Fifth Avenue (near F), Gaslamp, 619-233-2838. Surprise: this place strives to be inexpensive, like a Mexico City café-bar, where you hang out to watch soccer or talk over the night at two in the morning. They keep the kitchen open till the wee hours. Breakfasts are decent workaday deals, like the burrito stuffed with chorizo, spuds, and eggs. Try the interesting chicharon de queso that looks like a foot-long golden scroll, and watch for the impulsecooked teaser plates like cebollitas, small grilled onions in "Maggie's sauce." Spe-cialty is the namesake Alambres Mexico City-style taco, usually meat or fish plus bell peppers, onions, and bacon.

Bay Cafe 1050 North Harbor Drive, downtown, 619-595-1083. If you're hungry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsome bayview terrace (with no wheelchair access). After a chilly crossing, try the enjoyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced potatoes. The menu features breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches (all served with generic fries), variations on fish and chips including prawns, plus some entrée salads. The burgers are genuinely "have it your - for a few extra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mushrooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). Open daily, 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Inexpensive. -N.W. (8/01)

Dakota Grill and Spirits 901 Fifth Avenue (at E Street), Gaslamp, 619-234-5554. The name may hint at cowboy cooking, but look for simple mid-American comfort food at one of the many local eateries under the Cohn Restaurant Group aegis. A typical entrée includes a hunk of red (or "the other white") meat cooked on a woodfired grill, smeared with a precooked sauce that, for better or worse, first meets its mate on the plate. Meat-avoiders will find fish and poultry dishes, too. Tasty taters but dull veggies come with most entrées. Desserts run to fruity favorites like cobblers, crisps, and upside-down cake. Treats from the wide-ranging beverage list include three-glass wine flights in four styles of wine, and a pleasant house brew, Dakota Pale Ale, that suits the food. The two-floor restaurant offers big plush booths, tall windowed walls, and a piano player gliding from rinky-dink 1950s pop to Fats Waller stylings and Ellingtonian riffs. Valet parking. Full bar. Lunch weekdays; dinner nightly. High moderate to expensive. -N.W. (9/04)

Darband Fifth Avenue Grill 1556 Fifth Avenue, downtown, 619-230-1001. Darband is named after an exotic mountain resort north of Tehran. Quite a contrast to this sloping office-and-car-park strip of Fifth. Lunchtimes, office workers fill the tables. Evenings feel more, well, Persian. It's mostly men, some playing backgammon, talking, arguing, laugh-ing. With all the Farsi flying round, it feels like a local café back in Tehran. Food is good, fresh, regular Persian. "Khoresh Bademjan" is a tasty baby eggplant and beef stew. "Barg" is a safe bet, too - marinated beef tenderloin with rice. So is the vegetarian plate, though the veggie wrap's cheaper. Of course, kabobs star, as do yogurt-y, cucumber-y, minty flavors. Open lunch and dinner; closed Sunday. Inexpensive — EB(4/06)

DeMedici 815 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-702-7228. This lovely, cream-and-sepia dining room evokes an Italian Renaissance villa, while its sidewalk patio offers a prime pageant of Gaslamp follies. Either way, you'll enjoy exceptional service — attentive but utterly unobtrusive - and a menu centered on succulent pastas and refined seafood dishes. The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering; Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress on the spiffier side - some Hollywood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, up-ping the clothing curve. Dinner 5 p.m.to 10:30 p.m. weekdays, 5 p.m. to midnight weekends. Valet parking available. Moderate (simpler pastas) to very expensive. — N.W. (8/01)

Dublin Square 554 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-239-5818. The entire pub was hand-crafted in Waterford, shipped over, and installed (by Irish craftsmen) in the Gaslamp. The exterior indeed resembles a real (but very new) Dublin pub; the interior has authentically dim lighting and spirited Irish music, including live bands (acoustic but loud) during happy hours and some evenings. If you're looking for food, too, there's a fine corned beef and cabbage, resembling the corned beef of Katz's Deli on the Lower East Side — it's that wee touch o' the garlic that does the trick. Other choices include Guinness beef stew, shepherd's pie (made with ground beef), steaks, lamb medallion, fish and chips, and grilled fish, plus standard pub grub. Lunch and dinner (including Irish breakfast anytime) daily. Moderate. — NW. (3/02)

Kansas City Barbecue 610 West Market Street (at Harbor Drive), downtown, 619-231-9680. Scrumptious smells waft across the tracks at the Seaport Village trolley stop becued pork and beef. And yeah, this is the joint where Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis did their "sleazy bar scene" in Top Gun. And it is kinda sleazy, especially in the shadowy horseshoe bar, with memorabilia like hanging bras, Czech license plates, and stickers "Grow Your Own Dope: Plant A Man"). The beef and pork ribs (or rib tips or chicken breast) are worth it. They're cooked over an oak-fueled fire. Nice long happy hour (3:30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., at bar only) has great food/grub deals. Open daily, lunch until late, serving until 1 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* (3/01)

Max New York Steakhouse and **Seafood** 827 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-235-8500. As steakhouses go, Max is a good value, offering huge portions of fine, gently raised near-organic meat, cooked to order and offered at relatively gentle prices. You don't even have to pay extra for your veggies. For beef, there's full-flavored naturally raised Angus or butter-tender Kobestyle Wagyu beef. Or you can choose a viant rack of lamb, so tender it should be called Certified agnus. Sauces tend to be pedestrian; request them on the side. The classic steakhouse appetizers are done with some smart twists. Superb international wine list at below-average markups, including plenty by the glass. Full bar. Valet parking, or inexpensive lot via alley two doors north. Open nightly, until midnight on weekends. Upper moderate to very expensive. -N.W. (3/04)

Morton's of Chicago 285 J Street (between Second and Third), Gaslamp, 619-696-3369. This famous Chicago steakhouse is swanky, in a manly way: dark, clubby, luxurious, and louche. You go to Morton's for great steak. Their midwestern grain-fed beef is aged and meticulously grilled to your specifications. You can get a one-and-a-half or three-pound porterhouse, which will be juicy, marbled with flavorful fat. You can also get good fish at Morton's. The big, golden salmon fillet flakes to the fork and is moist, sweet, buttery. The pricey à la carte sides are either bad or mediocre. The Morton's Hot Chocolate Cake is exceptional. But go for the steak. Expensive. — M.N. (9/99)

Puerto la Boca 2060 India Street (at Hawthorn), Little Italy, 619-234-4900. Argentines love their beef and they love it lean and wholesome — free-range and grass fed. That's what you'll find at this uncompromisingly authentic out post of Buenos Aires cuisine. The great national entrée is the mixed grill (parrillada) for two or more - a massive meatarama featuring numerous grilled cuts of marinated beef, chicken, and sausages. Start with luscious beef or corn empanadas or, if you're feeling hungry and adventurous, matambre (rolled beef galantine). Not a steak lover? Try the shrimp "la boca." Don't eat meat? There are vegetarian pastas and pizzas. Gnocchi (*ñoquis*) are served only on the 29th of each month. International, affordable choice of wines, plus Latin and U.S. beers. Full bar. Patio dining. Lunch and dinner daily. – *N.W.* (8/05)

Rainwater's on Kettner 1202 Kettner Boulevard (at B Street), Little Italy, 619-233-5757. You could order the fish the chicken, or even the lamb, but odds are you're here because you want steak, prepared by people who respect your enthusiasm and offer prime beef in multiple cuts. And you're here because Rainwater's is venerable and local. You can dine old-style and enjoy it — warm cornbread fingers, a fine loose-packed crab cake, a crisp, watery wedge of iceberg lettuce under a blue cheese blanket. As for the beef, New York strip takes the day. You actually have to chew it — it ain't filet — but every chomp gives up scads of flavor. Order a side of greaseless, firm-bodied onion rings and wash it down with something from the exhaustive (and expensive) wine list. Lunch Monday through Friday from

11:30 a.m.; dinner daily. Very expensive. — *A.M.* (6/03)

Sidebar Deli California Western School of Law, corner of Second and Cedar, downtown, 619-525-1444. The motto of this place is "Every day's a good day, but some days are better than others." It certainly applies to the Sidebar, just because the daily specials can be gone in a flash. Students have fought class actions to secure lunch specials like spaghetti and meatballs with garlic bread. Of course there are always breakfast burritos, breakfast sandwiches like bacon or sausage and cheese, French Dip sandwiches, or California wraps. Open to the public, breakfast and lunch, weekdays. Inexpensive. — E.B. (10/05)

Stingaree 454 Sixth Avenue (between J and K), Gaslamp, 619-544-0867. This huge restaurant has a nightclub on the mezzanine and an outdoor lounge on the roof. The Mediterranean food by chef Antonio Friscia comes in three plate sizes - little, medium, and large. It's a built-in invitation to graze and share if you want to keep it light before you go dancing. The fare features premium, naturally raised meats, wild fish, and local organic vegetables. The rich in-ternational wine list is steep, but there's plenty by the glass; full bar. Friday and Saturday nights, dinner is a three- or four-course prix fixe only (your choices from the à la carte menu), but that gets vou free entry into the club. Reservations advisable, urged for weekends. Dinner Tuesday thorugh Sunday; rooftop noshing on Sunday afternoons. Dinners very expensive. — N.W. (8/06)

Strip Club 340 Fifth Avenue (at J Street), Gaslamp, 619-231-3140. This grill-your-own steak joint is a homage to Golden Hill's Turf Supper Club but if Turf is a low-budget indie cult film, Strip Club is the Gaslamp's big, brassy, high-budget Hollywood remake (even though prices, like those of movie tickets, are roughly the same). It's loud and handsome, and if the USDA Choice steaks (available in numerous cuts) are not quite as flavorful as Turfs, they're still good enough for the price — and you can take them up a notch with numerous spice blends and

Other choices include burgers, chicken breast, ahi tuna steak, and meat or seafood kabobs (the shrimp is particularly good, with peppers, onions, and meaty hunks of portobello mushroom). Entrées come with salad and puffy, cookit-yourself garlic bread, resembling hamburger buns with gigantiasis. Six veg and starch side dishes (including two types of gluey mashed potatoes) are available at extra cost; desserts are commercial ice cream novelties. Casual, no reservations, street-patio dining available. Over 21 only, no minors even with adult accompaniment. Dinners nightly, open until midnight Fri-day and Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W. (11/02)

Tesoro 548 Fifth Avenue (between Island and Market), Gaslamp, 619-234-5670. Sharp modern decor meets contemporary Mexican resort-style cuisine. Highlights include appetizers of panuchos de cochinita (soulful Yucatan-style pork and black bean mini-tostadas) and tarta de rajas, puffpastry layers covered with strips of poblano chile and melted Oaxaca cheese in cream. Chicken in black Oaxacan mole sauce is an interesting, authentic entrée, and filet mignon in a sauce of *jamaica* (hibiscus flowers) is luscious. Unfortunately, few entrées in clude any veggies or starches, and since flavors are intense, the mouth yearns for relief. Side dishes (costing extra) are largely limited to rice, good beans, house-made tortillas, chiles. Full bar including specialty tequila and beer drinks, Baja wines. Elevator available to mezzanine dining room and basement nightclub levels. Smart-casual dress, spiffy on weekends. Open daily lunch and dinner. High moderate to expensive. — N.W. (4/05)

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

1500 Ocean Hotel Del Coronado, 1500 Ocean Avenue, Coronado, 619-522-8490. A lovely indoor-outdoor dining venue replaces the vener able walled-in Prince of Wales at the Del. Now the food is breezier, too - Jason Schaefer (formerly of Laurel) cooks up refined "California coastal cuisine" with French and Asian influences, constructed with the beautiful luxury ingredients of each season. There's everything to like, from the patio with a beach view to the comfortable atmosphere that's dressy but not stiff. The wine list is awesome - rather steep but no gouging, including reasonably ma-ture top quaffs from France. Validated parking. Request assistance with handicapped access (stairs) when calling to reserve. Dinner nightly. Expensive. N.W. (7/06)

Asian Noodles Bay Plaza Shopping Center, 1430 East Plaza Boulevard Suite E-12, National City, 619-477-5390. You've got to be a noodle fan to be into this. It's an outpost of the venerable Ma Mon Luk family's Filipino restaurant empire. Mr. Ma went to Manila from China nearly a century ago and introduced the idea of egg noodles in a chicken soup (instead of rice noodles). His now-famous soup

(with beef or chicken these days) came to be called MaMi, (Mr. Ma's "Mi" noodles). Yes, MaMi's a little bland but it's filling, and their siopao (stuffed steam buns) make a good accompaniment. Most interesting is another in vention Ma Mon Luk claims: sweet spaghetti. Open 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B. (3/06)

Bistro D'Asia 1301 Orange Avenue (at B Avenue), Coronado, 619-437-6677. The relaxing restaurant attached to the hardy "Lizard Lounge" serves gentled-down dishes from all over East Asia. Among the tastiest are delicate lemon shrimps, vegetarian "monk's curry," and ice creams from Mootown Creamery. Peking Duck is accorded the full service, with a waitress garnishing the table's first round of delicate "flower buns" with crackly duck skin, scallions, and hoisin sauce Lizard Lounge next door now houses a sushi bar as well as a liquor bar. Reserve for weekend dinners. Street parking. Well-chosen wine list. Lunch and dinner daily. — N.W. (11/04)

China Super Buffet 3007 Highland Avenue #9, National City, 619-336-9989. This buffet promises "over 100 items daily." Yellow-gloved girls constantly rove the rows checking, stirring, wiping. A lot of the stuff is very good, like the marinated baby octopuses that look like large blushing spiders, or the mussels in their shells, bubbling golden on top with melted cheese, and of course, roast beef au jus. If you must be healthy, they have ming salad bars and adequate sushi It's an incredible value. Lunch and din ner daily. Inexpensive. - E.B. (4/05)

Giant Pizza King 600 Palm Avenue (at Rainbow), Imperial Beach, 619-423-7601. If pizza size matters to you, try on these nine-inch-wide, footlong, loaded pizza slices. They can flop but they can't fail. For alternatives, the fish and chips dish is pretty generous they make a large lasagna with garlic bread and salad, and the half-pound shrimp combo, fries, and salad is good value. You're near enough here to the beach to get supplies for sunset "green flash" parties — this is a full-on Italian take-out eatery with ham or turkey subs, spaghetti with meatballs, halfpound burgers, and more. Open daily, 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Inexpensive. -*E.B. (10/05)*

Lizard Lounge 1301 Orange Avenue (at B), Coronado, 619-437-6677 This venerable saloon, a Navy oldtimers' favorite since the era when lounge lizards in leisure suits stalked the earth, now houses a good little sushi bar at one end of its spirits bar. The rice is well-seasoned, the seafood tastes sparkling-fresh, and each *nigiri* is given its own individual garnish (e.g., lemon with the hamachi roll). Most of the inside-out party rolls are variations of the California roll formula, with the same center of sweet crab and avocado, but there's also a lively mango-albacore roll, featuring tempura shrimp, avo cado, and *ponzu*. For best seats and peaceful eating, come early; the bar fills fast and the room can get downright rowdy as the night rolls on. Street parking. Lunch/dinner daily. Moderate. -N.W. (11/04)

Lydia's Cafe and Nightclub 1628 Palm Avenue, San Diego 619-429-3603. This easygoing dancing/eatery has a faithful following that goes back to 1957. But before you dance, eat! Check out the birria en su jugo (goat in its juices) with beans, rice, and tortillas, or enjoy filling snacks like taquitos, cucaracha (a corn tortilla

stuffed with ham, cheese, and sour cream), or the snack Lydia says she invented: botanas (beans, pork, and melted cheese over corn chips). Open daily, three meals, (Call ahead for availability of the birria.) Inexpensive. -E.B. (11/00)

McP's Irish Pub & Grill 1107 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-5280. With a crowd ranging from Navy retirees to chic singles barely of drinking age, the perpetual party on McP's' patio is nurtured by above-average Irish-Mexican-American pub grub (burgers, potato skins, nachos, etc.). The Irish fare includes a pleasing Mulligan stew served in a hollowed bread-loaf and an absolutely fabulous corned beef and cabbage plate with tender, thick slices surrounding cabbage so young and sweet it ought to be carded. Good soups, too. Open daily, standard pub hours. (Breakfast Sunday during football season.) Inexpensive to low moderate. — *N.W.* (4/01)

Village Club Card Room 429 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-425-3333. Yes, it's mostly poker players, but any body can come in and order a meal. And here's the thing: first-time players get their meal free. Of course, the idea is to keep players' bellies full so they can return to the game, so even second-timers get a deal with down-home comfort-dishes like grilled chicken breast sandwich, spaghetti with meat-balls and garlic bread, or garlic shrimp with fried rice and egg, plus Chinese dishes including Kung Pao beef or chicken, Mongolian beef, and a good wonton soup with noodles. Cardroom open and non-Chinese food menu ilable 24 hours; Chinese menu noon to 3:30 a.m. Inexpensive. - E.B. (1/04)

Big Boy Restaurant Agua Caliente Boulevard #9892 (across the street from the old bullring), Tijuana, 686-3788. Besides having excellent Mexican-American food, this Big Boy knock-off draws some of the most interesting people in Tijuana — journalists, lawyers, cattle ranchers, politicians, Baja's heavy hitters. Day or night, Big Boy is always busy. Gringo food's no problem. Breakfast includes eggs, bacon, sausage, chorizo or ham, plus hash browns or frijoles, toast, juice, and endless coffee. Nobody will object if you sit sipping the free refills till the moon comes up. But you won't - you'll crack and order more when you smell the popular, macho "roval" hamburger, with two beef patties, smoked ham, onions, lettuce, tomatoes, fries, and salad. Or the chicken breast marinated in tequila with cilantro, guacamole, and beans. Open 24/7. Inexpensive. - E.B. (11/00)

Café la Especial Avenida Revolución #718 (down the market steps), Tijuana, 685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American aficionados of Tijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros. Summer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-to-gringos ratio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to carne asada and bistek ranchero, from

cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the steamed taco stand upstairs. That's still going too. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. - E.B. (5/02)

El Faro de Mazatlán Boulevard Sánchez Taboada #9542, Plaza Financiera, Zona Río, Tijuana, 684-8882, 684-8883, or 684-2236. We're talking safe, reliable, middle-class fish-fare here. The "Lighthouse of Mazatlán" is bright, blue, and white with smart varnished wood furniture and delivers fish, lobster, oyster, squid, and shrimp dishes that are easy to like. Generous free appetizers include marlin ceviche, fried fish, and fish albóndigas soup. The interesting part is in trying dishes like the sea snail salad. (After a few closed-eve bites, it's delicious - like eating a sliced clam. It's great in a Caesar.) Look for original ways with octopus, *pez espada* (swordfish) and others. One of the simplest, best dishes: the cabicucho (Mexican sea bass), charbroiled but moist and really better without its ranchero sauce. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. — E.B. (6/05)

El Rodeo Boulevard Salinas #1647, Tijuana, 686-5640. This 30-year-old steak haven sits on traffic-drowned Salinas, but climb onto its porch and you're at some Sonoran desert rancho, saguaro cacti and all Inside it's dark wood and brick, wagon wheels, lariats, rifles, longhorns, and generous amounts of cattle-ranch food. Entrée price includes a delicious soup of roast beef juices, beans cooked in their own juices, a quesadilla, a salad, two botana (snack) plates, of, say, vinegary veggies and potatoes, and a beef liver medley, flour tortillas, chips, and hot sauce. You can get any cut of steak you want. A parril-lada — BBQ dish — gives you marinated beef rib, carne asada, and barbecued chicken, all sizzling on a rancho-style metal tabletop grill that glows with hot coals. Best part: the roasted spring onions splayed across the meat. Dessert and coffee also included. Good place for a party. Open 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. — E.B. (5/05)

La Escondida Santa Monica #1 (in Fraccionamiento Las Palmas), Tijuana, 681-4458. This hidden ("escondida") mansion has been a restaurant for three decades. The terrazzo and garden overlooking the Tijuana River valley make breakfast and dinners a treat. House specialties are more interesting than the regular fare. Try the seafood casserole *(cacerola de mariscos)*, the *tambor* (a dish of layered beef, cheese, and pork), or the roasted baby Monterrey goat ("cabrito tatemado"). Desserts include the house especial, mango and ice cream with rompope (Mexican egg nog), and crepas de cajeta con nieve, crêpes with walnuts, green pistachio ice cream, and "burnt milk" caramel sauce — the nearest thing to liquid fudge this side of par adise. On weekends the place rocks with parties and live music. The big downside: It's hard to find. Take Agua Caliente Boulevard one half mile past the racetrack, turn right at Las Palmas then left at the Rey del Pollo sign. The La Escondida entrance sign is in red neon at the road's end. Open daily for breakfast, lunch, dinner, Moderate, ---E.B. (1/05)

La Vuelta Avenida Revolución #8210 (above 11th), Tijuana, 685-7309. Bring your lover here and hide away in one of the cuddly carretitas - nooks. Even if

traffic is ghastly at "the turn" (*"la vuelta"*) where Revoluci̳n hooks left, you forget all that inside this vestige of Olde Tijuana, with balcony seating, resident mariachis, and food and drink all day and night. Dive into a *combinacion mexicana* (chile relleno, taco, and en-chilada) or *carne asada* served in an *olla* de barro, an earthenware pot from Guadalajara. Even the gringo-sounding filete mignon with mushroom sauce somehow comes out Mexican. Most Mexicans actually turn up about 1 a.m. after their own parties, to be serenaded by the excellent ten-piece mariachi band. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* (6/03)

Restaurante Don Quijote Hotel El Conquistador (ground floor), 10750 Boulevard Agua Caliente, Tijuana, 681-7955. This tribute to the great windmill tilter himself serves as break fast, lunch, and dinner anchor for the town's truest colonial Mexican posada (inn). It's a world of glowing stainedglass windows, heavy doors, and black wrought iron. You expect Zorro himself to come clattering out from the shadows on his horse. The food is stan-dard middle-class Mexican fare, but between quail dishes and enchiladas, creations like cheese-stuffed shrimp wrapped in bacon pop out. Nicest sur-prise? Sopa Azteca, with tortilla strips, grated cheese, chopped dark red chiles, and avocado. Inexpensive to moderate. Open three meals, seven days. -E.B. (2/06)

Buca di Beppo 705 Sixth Avenue (at G Street), Gaslamp, 619-233-7272. Also at 10749 Westview Parkway, Mira Mesa, 858-536-2822; 1921 Calle Barcelona, Carlsbad, 760-479-2533. People come here to celebrate, in party droves, by gobbling huge plates of "themed" Italian. Bucca di Beppo ("Joe's Cellar") is a mighty national chain — but it works. Downtown's rabbit-warren of low-ceilinged dining rooms is plastered with Italian photos (check out Sophia Loren, transfixed by Jane Mansfield's breasts) and crowded with customers chowing down from portions large enough to feed two or more. Try the *penne arrabiata* with its spicy sausage or the popular chicken parmigiana. Standard stuff, but what the heck — you're having fun. Don't leave without conquering the moun-tainous, wicked Bella Festa, two huge balls of ice cream on double chocolate cakes running with sambuca sauce, caramel, and nuts on an 18-inch plate. Open for lunch and dinner daily. In

California Pizza Kitchen 3363 Nobel Drive, La Jolla Village Square, La Jolla, 858-457-4222. Also at Beachwalk Plaza, 437 South Coast Highway 101, Suite 601, Solana Beach, 858-793-0999 Carmel Mountain Plaza, 11602 Carmel Mountain Road, Carmel Mountain 858-675-4424; and Fashion Valley Mall (second level), Suite 901, 7007 Friars Road, Mission Valley, 619-298-4078. Two Beverly Hills lawyers started this chain in 1985 to exploit "the premium pizza segment." Some 150 restaurants later, guess it worked. The place is all shiny chrome, glass, etched palm trees, golden wood and black furniture, and two pizza ovens with real logs burning inside. The Original BBQ chicken pizza, the chain's first hit, is still their top seller. It has barbecue sauce, smoked Gouda and mozzarella cheeses BBQ chicken, red onions, and cilantro

The BBQ chicken chopped salad is good too, as is the jambalaya. If you've got a sweet tooth, but are embarrassed to order "Hawaiian" pizza, try the pear and Gorgonzola. It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions, Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. At night, the Nobel Drive branch features a view of the shining Mormon cathe-dral. Joe's is silly with crab-shack ambiance (campy nautical paraphernalia on down to souvenir gimme caps), but the food's not bad. You can choose buckets of steamed, barbecued, or garlic crab (of various subspecies), or go for fried or grilled seafood or steaks, or salads. Grown-ups may prefer the patio to the rockin', raucous interior. Full bar, not much wine. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W. (5/01)

The Original Pancake House 3906 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-1740. Starve yourself for eight hours, then come in here and order up an Apple Pancake — a foot-wide, bat ter-filled, five-egg paradise pelted with slices from two Granny Smith apples and baked till it puffs up like a golden mini-superdome. Cinnamon cinches it. The German Pancake, or its kid brother, the Dutch Baby, are good oven-baked alternatives, as is the really, really filling mushroom omelet, which comes with three pancakes. Oh, and the Eggs Michael: sausage patties and poached eggs lost somewhere under a mushroom-sherry sauce. The whole atmosphere — striped gold-and-cream wallpaper, dainty cups, shelves of ceramic dogs - feels like it's the Fifties and your granny took you here when you were five. Okay, it's a na tionwide franchise, but it's a comfy franchise, from Oregon. All-day breakfast only, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. Other locations at 14905 Pomerado Road, Poway, 858-679-0186; 160 South Rancho Santa Fe Road, Encinitas, 760-943-1939; 435 South Melrose Drive, Vista, 760-758-3441. E.B. (4/02)

Ruth's Chris Steak House 11582 El Camino Real (at Arroyo Sorrento), Sorrento Hills, 858-755-1454. Flashcooked steaks from the finest wet-aged corn-fed USDA Prime, seasoned with salt, pepper, butter, and parsley, are the hallmark of this 95-location chain. If you aren't a salt offender, ask the kitchen to use a lighter touch. All side dishes are à la carte but come in portions large enough to feed two. The broiled tomatoes, caramelized with a touch of sugar, are a delight, and potatoes are offered in eight guises. A pecan-topped sweet potato casserole, although delicious, would be better as dessert. Non-beef-eaters can choose from numerous luxurious seafood dishes, a cheese-stuffed chicken breast, grilled portobello mushrooms, and six salads. Award-winning wine list is steep but serious, with an average bottle price of \$70 but reasonable markups and wines over \$100 offered at retail price. The main room harbors a fabulous view of the ocean if you arrive before sunset, but it's noisy - tables upstairs are quieter. Dinner nightly; lunch Friday only. Also downtown, with equally stunning views, at 1355 North Harbor Drive, 619-233-1422. Very expensive. – B.D. (5/05)

onathan Kasdan becomes the second son of Lawrence Kasdan, after Jake, to have followed his father into the director's chair. His feature debut, *In the Land of Women*, is a relationship thing at about the Cameron

Crowe level of wit and wisdom, although perhaps that name offers itself as a reference point because of the way in

which every significant mood or moment is swept up, and along, by a pop song on the soundtrack. The "heartsick' hero - a twenty-six-year-old Hollywood screenwriter (soft porn but bigger ambitions) who has just been dumped by his gamine girlfriend, an up-and-coming actress and Levi's model - slinks out of L.A. and off to suburban Michigan to stay with his demented grandmother and to work on that long-brewing "personal" project about his high-school days. In nineteen movies out of twenty, he could be expected, there, to encounter a viable alternative or two, but even though he's surrounded by females, none is really viable as an alternative. Apart from his cranky, crotchety, foulmouthed, bird-flipping, thoroughly stereotyped grandmother (Olympia Dukakis), the house across the street

contains three other females, as well as the mostly absent man of the house. The mother, patently, is too old for him and has breast cancer (we can judge how serious the movie is from the fact that Meg Ryan shaves off her


hair, or appears to have shaved off her hair, and throws up on the rug), and the angry Abstract Expressionist genage

Expressionist teenage daughter (Kristen Stewart) is much too young for him, and the precocious yoga-practicing French-speaking preteen daughter (Makenzie Vega) is still younger. They all, in any event, have something to learn and to teach. His uncertain relationships with each of them, as confidant, advisor, whatever, are fairly absorbing in their development and evolvement; and the film is plainly aiming for the human, the real, the true, even if the whole thing has been fastidiously planed and sanded and varnished to glide along like a sailboat on a glassy lake. And Adam Brody, with his sleepy slurry manner of speech and slouchy burdened posture, makes a sympathetic and a likable hero. And I suppose, if you can view him from that angle, a cute one. He looks as though he could still be playing collegians and even high-schoolers.



Hot Fuzz, a British cop spoof, benefits from its proximity to *Reno 911!: Miami*. Everything, as we are repeatedly reminded, is relative, and there are cop spoofs and cop spoofs. This one comes from the team — Edgar Wright, director and co-writer together with the star, Simon Pegg — who brought you *Shaun of the Dead*, a zombie spoof, and it constitutes neither an advance nor a reverse. It holds its ground. If the laughter tends to be spotty and unlusty, the labor is always energetic, conscientious, attentive to detail, limitedly resourceful. Pegg, with a head like a handball, small and hard and perfectly round, stays commendably in character as a stick-up-the-butt straight arrow (beverage of choice, on duty or off: cranberry juice) who has

shamed his big-city colleagues with his four-hundred-percent higher arrest rate ("You can't be *Sheriff* of London!"), and has accordingly been reassigned to a cozy little hamlet that's "statistically" the safest place in the kingdom. (Telling detail: the completely bare Evidence Room at police headquarters.) The statistics, however, prove to be skewed by the peculiar


policy of filing suspicious deaths under "accidents." A serial killer would seem to be afoot, and some of the slayings are sufficiently gruesome to kill the laughs, if any were struggling into existence. And the endless climaxes, down the homestretch, are extremely taxing even as a spoof of the actionfilm cliché of endless climaxes. Still, one wouldn't have wanted them to stop before the fistfight in the miniature village, an optical illusion of a literal Battle of the Titans, Godzillascale human figures in a kiddie theme park. Then again, one might have wanted them to stop, or turn aside, before the fistfight's gruesome conclusion.

After the Wedding, directed by Susanne Bier, was the Danish also-ran for the most recent foreign-film Oscar. In it, a fair-haired do-gooder at an insolvent Bombay orphanage is summoned against his will to his native Copenhagen on a hat-in-hand fundraising mission, and upon arrival is summoned additionally to the wedding of Mr. Moneybags's daughter.

To our surprise (and who else's?), Mrs. Moneybags turns out to be an old flame of the do-gooder, and the bride turns out (clearly to the dogooder's surprise) to be his biological daughter. Despite the credible if sometimes histrionic acting of the unknown faces (plus the newly known one of the Casino Royale villain, Mads Mikkelsen), despite the vérité camerawork and jaggedy jump cuts, despite the Third World social consciousness, this is basic soap opera. To say so is not to denigrate it, but perhaps is just to wish that it had a bit more polish, a bit more shine. It is not *pure* soap opera; it is impure soap opera. The digital video looks pretty decent, compared, anyway, to what we got used to seeing in the Dogma 95 days of the Danish cinema. Still, it's a far cry from Universal Pictures in the Technicolor Fifties, and its grittiness and griminess stubbornly resist the suds.

Perfect Stranger has been designed for the perfect fool. Apparently built backwards from its final Surprise Twist, it looks until then to be a deluxe edition of a Lifetime Original, directed by the reputable James Foley (At Close Range, Glengarry Glen Ross, among other gravities), with an Oscar-winning

star (the perennially underemployed Halle Berry) as a muckraking investigative reporter under a male pseudonym. When her lifelong girlfriend turns up on a slab at the morgue with belladonna in her system, she resolves to take a closer look at the departed's latest Internet liaison, a married Madison Avenue mover-andshaker (Bruce Willis, using his smirk for sinister purposes), and lands a temp job at his ad agency (key clients: Victoria's Secret and recently acquired Reebok, thanks for the plugs), where he quickly rises to the bait, checking her up and down in slow-motion as they pass on the carpet. Tucked away in the background, she has a stock computer geek as a helper (Giovanni Ribisi, with his patented stuffy-nose delivery and demeanor), and the screen is often taken up by computer screen, an albatross of the contemporary cinema. Inasmuch as the scene in which the boss's Amazonian leather-clad lesbian assistant admonishes the temp not to speak to the boss directly — a scene on view in the coming-attractions trailer — has been snipped from the finished print, the events unfold facilely and undemandingly until the tangle of that Surprise Twist. Only the willing fool will be (1) fooled and (2) fulfilled. ■



the forces of entrenched economics. On the virtuous side of every issue — in favor of free education, opposed to animal cruelty - and an eligible bachelor to boot (and in Welsh actor Ioan Gruffudd, a broodingly handsome one), he is obviously a man we should be better acquainted with, and in that sense the movie performs a public service. The higher sense in which a movie may perform a public service, how-ever, is by being a good movie; and a rightminded one about such a clear-cut and long-established right is apt to lack a little something in tension. To have dramatized this story in, say, 1807 would have been a different matter. From two centuries' distance, it plays as not so much a drama as a ceremony, a consecration, appropriately culminating in an on-screen standing ovation, followed by an editorial eulogy, followed by a sitting ovation. Under the experienced directorial hand of Michael Apted, the movie is well dressed and well decorated and well acted (Michael Gambon, Ciarán Hinds, Albert Finney, Bill Paterson, Rufus Sewell, Romola Garai, Benedict Cumberbatch), and yet the "artfully" faded image looks all too literally like the ashes of time. 2007. ★ (HORTON PLAZA 14)

Blades of Glory — Competitive figure skating gets the Will Ferrell treatment: rough and rude. Banned for life from the men's division, two bitter rivals (the macho Ferrell, the femme Jon Heder) return to the ice through a loophole as the first-ever male pair. Black Book — Paul Verhoeven goes back to his native Holland, back, that is, from his Robocop and his Basic Instinct and his Showgirls and his Starship Troopers, back to the subject of Soldier of Orange, the Second World War, the Nazi occupation, the Dutch resistance. Grindhouse — It sounded like a fun idea at first. Two movies in one, a prepackaged double feature, in emulation of, or tribute to, the Golden Age exploitation films of the Sixties and Seventies, the last of the B-pic-

tures, the Joe Bob Briggs drive-in movies, the 42nd Street grindhouse fare. Planet Terror and Death Proof by name, directed by separate hands, each preceded by one or more fake trailers for nonexistent titles such as Machete and Werewolf Women of the SS. So far, so fun. But the designated directors, Robert Rodriguez and Quentin Tarantino, those tasteless connoisseurs of cinema, were bad bets to carry it off with straight faces and restrained egos. (Hadn't they, in any event, done this already, Rodriguez directing and Tarantino writing, in From Dusk till Dawn, a schizophrenic graft of two distinct genres?) And the running

time of three hours and ten minutes - a concrete measure of unrestrained egos proves to be wildly excessive, a grind indeed, despite the quaint device of the "missing reel" in each film, complete with apologetic title cards from the theater management: "Sorry for the inconvenience." This device, not just from the time-saving standpoint (another "missing reel" or two would not have been missed), is genuinely a good idea, redolent of Poverty Row moviegoing. So, too, is the simulation of scratched celluloid, splicelike skips, loosesprocket jumps. But the modern settings of the films (text-messaging in both of them; a

The Hoax — A tall tale about a tall tale, the bogus "authorized autobiography" of Howard Hughes, peddled by Clifford Irving to McGraw-Hill in the early Seventies. Richard Gere, as the hungering writer ("The middle of my life is at hand. I don't have a couch"), has some funny bits imitating Hughes's speech patterns from tapes of his appearance before the U.S. Senate, as you might recall from The Aviator. And the richly embroidered account of how the charade was set in motion, and then kept in motion even as it began to disintegrate, will serve as either a reminder or an appetizer, depending on your level of familiarity. The Host — South Korean creature feature, a tad overlong and a bit wavery in tone, yet very well made on the whole, and especially well made in its computer-animated creature, a two-legged, amphibious, carnivorous, whale-scale fish, with a toothy Venus-flytrap mouth. (Blame it on the Americans, Scott Wilson specifically, dumping toxic chemicals from a U.S. Army base into the Han River.) The first sight of the beast, hanging batlike from the underside of a bridge, is as real as unreal can be; and director Joon-ho Bong mixes up a marvelous variety of views of the thing, far enough in the squinty distance to defy belief, and close as an express subway hurtling past the platform a few feet in front of your face. The shot of the beast vomiting up a pile of bones in its sewer lair is a certifiable

highlight. There are curious touches of pratfall comedy, from which the fish itself is not immune, slipping and rolling on unsteady land legs. And the narrow focus on one family's search for a carried-off little girl (there's scant evidence of a widespread hunt for the monster) threatens the movie continually with sentimentality, and at the end, when all surviving family members must get in on the act, threatens it with silliness. Into Great Silence — Philip Gröning's nearly three-hour documentary on a Carthusian monastery in the French Alps, covering a space of time from winter to winter. (Since the German filmmaker, a one-man crew, spent but five months in the monastery, one must presume a bit of editing-room illusionism at work.) Evocative rather than instructive, lyrical rather than factual, sensorial rather than verbal, it is rich in sights and sounds, closely, carefully observed. Singly, the shots, the scenes, do not last long, do not drag. But they mount up. And up and up and up. A labor of love, with the accent on labor, this one-of-a-kind study is marked not so much by any great technical facility or stylistic flair as by its fundamental tact and restraint, a respect for its subject, not quite a reverence. Character interest is minimal. We do not get to "know" any of the monks, although, in individual portraits interspersed throughout, we get to look straight into the eyes of each of them, who endure the examination with

fort. These men are most often observed in solitary activities, reflective of their daily regimen: praying, reading, gardening, preparing or delivering or consuming food, and so on. There is no narrative thread. No one dies. No one quits. No one gets expelled. Nothing "happens." The film in a sense is irreducible: impossible to encapsulate, impossible to summarize. Could it not, though, have been reduced in length? Possibly. Slightly. But who's to say by how much? Gröning was granted — and he grants us in turn - a privileged view inside a private world, and it is not a world for the tourist on a tight schedule. It is a world for life. Our guide has not attempted to make that world palatable to the idle bystander, has not attempted unduly to process it and package it. The queue of people who will want access to it is bound to be miles shorter than a queue for the private world of, let's say, the football locker room or the rock-group tour bus. But whomever this film is for, however few they may be, they're lucky to have it. The gravest danger in the length of the thing is simply the temptation, by the end of it, to flatter yourself that you've become one of the boys, that you've grown "close." I Think I Love My Wife — Into a complacent marriage comes temptation, the wet-lipped Kerry Washington, a Platonic old friend with vertiginous décolletage. Chris Rock is the star, albeit no actor, and he's also the director and co-writer, nominally inspired by the last of Eric Rohmer's "Six Moral Tales," Chloe in the Afternoon, 1972. (The "Fin" in place of "The End" is perhaps the strongest evidence.) The firstperson narration, however, sets the tone closer to a stand-up routine: "Going to the Auto Show and looking at the minivans was like going to the strip club and looking at the deejay," rat-a-tat. And even as the torrent of voice-over tapers off, whatever is left on screen seems mere illustration of a comic monologue, mere visual embellishment. Somehow the toil of "dramatic reenactment" takes the edge off the individual voice, dulls it. Gina Torres, Steve Buscemi, Edward Herrmann. 2007. ★ (GASLAMP 15)

The Last Mimzy — Kid-friendly end-ofthe-world science fiction (adult-tolerant) revolving around a Seattle brother and sister who find a toybox from the future, and inside it a flop-eared stuffed bunny by the name of Mimzy. The founder and studio head of New Line Cinema, Bob Shaye, trusted himself to direct his first film, and the inexperience shows. It does not, however, completely conceal a good idea about time travel and good visual use of Buddhist mandalas. The bunny is an eyesore. Lawrence of Arabia — The movie that introduced, world-wide, the tormented eyes of Peter O'Toole and the moony eyes of Omar Sharif is, more importantly, an unabridged lexicon of sun-and-sand imagery. Scrupulously compiled by director David Lean and his photographer Freddie Young (Nicolas Roeg served on the second unit), it's the standard reference work for every desert movie ever since. Not even the fully restored (or nearly fully) Director's Cut, however, all 220 or so minutes of it, can clear up the enigma of T.E. Lawrence. With Anthony Quinn, Alec Guinness, Arthur Kennedy, and Jack Hawkins. 1962. ★★ (KEN, 4/23)

The Lives of Others — The bad old days of the Berlin Wall and the Big Brother tactics of the GDR secret police, the Stasi. The case in point: a Party pooh-bah has the hots for a celebrated stage actress and, to clear the way, orders some dirt dug up on her playwright boyfriend, an apparently loyal socialist of spotless reputation despite his openly subversive friends and despite, too, his openly snooty manner. Ulrich Tukur, so memorable as the conscience-stricken Nazi of Amen, is good again in the less complex and less sympathetic role of the bureaucratic brownnoser who heads up the investigation. But the better role and better per-







formance belong to another Ulrich, last name Mühe, coincidentally the conscienceless Doctor Mengele of Amen, now playing the relentless bullet-headed interrogator charged to carry out the dirty work, taking it all in (including the indiscretions of the higher-ups), giving nothing away, keeping his opinions to himself, eventually keeping his findings to himself as well, crawling a long way out on a limb. Martina Gedeck and Sebastian Koch as actress and playwright have some complexity, too, to com plement and compromise their outward artiness. Watching it all unfold is more than passably interesting, if not particularly to look at (nauseously green), and even though the run-on epilogue is rather cumbersome. The new-name filmmaker bears a name befitting the monocle-brandishing antagonist in a Viennese operetta, Florian Henckel von Donnersmarck. 2006. ★★ (HILLCREST CINEMAS)

The Lookout — Respectable directing debut by the veteran screenwriter of The Interpreter, Minority Report, Out of Sight, Get Shorty, Malice, etc., Scott Frank. Suffering brain damage in a car wreck four years earlier, still having trouble with his memory and his "sequencing" and his "disinhibition," writing memos to himself like the protagonist of Memento, holding down a dead-end job as the night custodian in a podunk Kansas bank, and replaying past glories on the high-school hockey rink with a "urinal puck" and a floor mop, the shaky young hero is preyed upon by a vamp-for-hire (stage name: Luvlee Lemons) at the bidding of a mangy gang of bank robbers. The only apparent obstacle in their way is the affable deputy who, like clockwork, stops by on his rounds with a box of donuts, and whose wife is ready to give birth any minute. (What odds would you take on him making it through alive?) Not overly contrived or clever, just sufficiently; no extraneous action to tide you over till hell breaks loose; well acted by Joseph Gordon-Levitt, Jeff Daniels (as a wise and witty blind man), Matthew Goode, Isla Fisher, Bruce McGill, pretty much everyone. 2007. ★★ (GASLAMP 15)

Meet the Robinsons — Dizzying Disney computer cartoon in 3-D. The startling spatial effects, technically unimpeachable, really do add another dimension. But maybe another dimension is not what's wanted when you are already juggling a mind-tangling time machine, a domestic nuthouse descended from You Can't Take It with You, a Victorian villain of Neanderthal intellect, a displaced dinosaur, a tipped hat to surrealism (Magritte's bowler), an hommage to HAL 9000 in 2001, and more. It's all a bit much. Make that, more than a bit. The motto and moral of the movie — "Keep moving forward" will be revealed in the printed epilogue to have come straight from the mouth of Uncle Walt himself, a sweet piece of lip service. Miss Potter — First directing job for Chris Noonan in the eleven years since Babe, an innocuous biopic on the author and illustrator of The Tale of Peter Rabbit, not to mention proto-feminist and protoenvironmentalist, who braved the disparagement of gray-souled publishers ("Bunnies in jackets with brass buttons? However do you imagine such things?"), as well as the disparagement of her meddling matchmaking mother, to produce her first book at the spinsterly age of thirty-two. The role encourages Renée Zellweger to behave a bit like a smug chipmunk sitting on the private knowledge of a secret stash of acorns. Or rather, since the actress served also as an executive producer, you could say she en-couraged *herself* to behave like that. The vindication of history, while removing any tension from the proceedings, encourages the viewer to mirror the same smirk. Ewan

McGregor is very game and quite charming as the damp-behind-the-ears publisher who gives her her big break and also provides hope (plus the merest wisp of tension) of a matrimonial Happily Ever After. And Bill Paterson, as the Potter paterfamilias, models a prodigious set of muttonchops. The touches of animation which bring the drawings of Beatrix Potter to life are too few to have been worth the bother, but not too few to imply dissatisfaction with, if not further disparagement of, those drawings. The Namesake — Soggy, sloggy family saga, adapted from the novel by Jhumpa Lahiri, spanning from Calcutta 1977 to New York City present day, and for the title figure, christened Gogol after the 19th-century Russian writer, spanning from mere gleam-in-the-eye to aspiring architect, engagement-breaker, husband and then cuckold. The passage of time, so effortless on the page, is rather a strain on the cast, although Irrfan Khan and Tabu as the father and mother handle it better than the young and younger actors who, at different times, play the protagonist and his eventual bride. All of the main characters are decently individualized, but the meat-and-potatoes theme, or possibly curry-and-rice theme, of Indian traditionalism vs. progressivism, especially as regards choosing a mate, drags them into the commonplace. Nashville — Robert Altman continues to course over salient features of the American Scene with amazing speed and mobility. His leaps-and-bounds progress is made to look effortless, smooth, liquidy because of his habit of skimming, primarily. Here, he and his allies visit Music City, U.S.A., but they arrive there with their ideas already in place and unalterable. Their air of amusement seems smugly knowing and not at all enlightening. Altman and Company have edged up to their chosen site and have declined to get more than their feet wet. It is surely an audacious idea, and worth pursuing, to do a movie about country music which employs no authentic country singers, only songs written by the imposter performers themselves, and a musical arranger without country music background or interest. The result: a curious lack of excitement in the music, lack of awareness of the music audience, lack of appreciation of the creative work involved. Altman uses a Peyton Place complicated structure, a thick weave of characters and plotlines. But, without doing any real plotting, he uses it to disguise the fact that he deals in onenote, monotonous, uncomplicated characters and events. Still, there are a few agree able faces in the milling mob. Karen Black, more than anyone else, makes a recognizable attempt to sing country-style. David Peel displays a scrubbed pink face and impeccable manners as a docile college grad whose function in life is to be his Papa's Pride. Lily Tomlin and two deaf-mute children create an interesting, arbitrary domestic situation, acting with perfectly straight faces in a movie overrun with smirks. Once Upon a Time in the West — The

Its main character Marieta (played by Monica Cervera of El Crimen Perfecto) is a work in progress: she dresses as a woman, has breast implants, but still retains the 20-centimeter remnant that prevents her from becoming the totally feminine woman she so greatly desires to be. Marieta also has narcolepsy and falls asleep in the most inappropriate places and at the most inopportune times. During these "narcoleptic episodes" she dreams of Broadway musical numbers in which she stars backed by a cast of hundreds decked out in the wildest of costumes! 20 Centimeters is part hilarious musical comedy and part sensitive character portrayal of people who live just outside the edge of what is cruelly called "normal."

David Leavitt's novel *The Lost Language of Cranes*, about a father and son coming out at the same time, has been adeptly adapted to film. It's understated, heartfelt, and wonderfully acted with charming turns by real-life gay director John Schlesinger (*Midnight Cowboy*) and Altman regular René Auberjonois.

Canada's John Greyson has a unique arsenal of queer films to his credit. *Lilies*' story of blossoming love amongst a trio of young men in an all-boys school leads to jealousy and betrayal. Much of it is told through flashback via a prison "passion play," with male convicts playing male and female roles.

Patricia Rozema's exhilarating directorial debut, *I' ve Heard the Mermaids Singing*, was made on a shoestring budget. A thirty-something Toronto "gal Friday" (marvelously played by the quirky Sheila McCarthy) works at a private gallery and becomes enamored of her female boss. This minor gem confronts the mysteries of love and conceptions — and misconceptions — of art.

He centers on a preadolescent girl (wide-eyed, plump-lipped Ivana Baquero) chided by her nine-months-pregnant mother (Ariadna Gil, very intense) as too old to be still filling her head with the "nonsense" of fairy tales, especially since she has moved beneath the roof of her wicked stepfather (Sergi López, campily over the top), a Francoist martinet busily stamping out rebels in the woods, who has little tolerance for a child of another bloodline but is eager to get his leather-sheathed hands on his biological baby in his wife's womb. Much more welcoming of the little girl is the mythological faun (real or imagined?), the guardian of the off-limits garden, who identifies the newcomer straight off as the prodigal daughter of the King of the Underworld (what are the odds?). Del Toro, almost in spite of himself, is not altogether guiltless of conventional, parental, puritanical strictures against fairy tales. In his scrupulous, perhaps overscrupulous, balance of dark fantasy and brutal history, tilted (politically, diplomatically) a little to ward the latter, he leaves nothing to chance. He establishes the Importance of his theme

through the unassailable realm of Fascists

and freedom fighters, and he connects that world to the parallel universe of fairy tales in a way that can best be termed didactic, academic, studied, possibly stifling. He makes a case. He does not make magic. Far more than The Devil's Backbone, the film that keeps coming to mind, always to this one's disadvantage, is Victor Erice's Spirit of the Beehive, 1973. That one, having in common a post-Civil War backdrop and a gullible little girl, made very much the same points, together with others, and made them more subtly, more ambiguously, more poetically; made them, moreover, while Franco was still in power; and made them without recourse to special effects beyond a Halloween get-up of Frankenstein's monster. Del Toro never lets his special effects here, some of them pretty tacky and icky, take over to the same extent as in his comic-book Hollywood movies (Blade II, Hellboy), but a mere black-gloved sadist, even with an open gash on his cheek, has a hard time holding his own against an arboreal goat-god, an insectile pixie, a feature less humanoid with eyes in the palms of his hands, an obscene giant toad, a Tim Burton-esque airless sunless tangled landscape, and so forth. 2006. ★ (LA PALOMA)

Premonition — Time-tripping thriller wherein a normal, average, earthbound housewife and mother, whose parenting skills seem to consist solely of addressing her two daughters as "Baby," wakes up on alternate days to find that her husband is dead, not yet dead, again dead, not yet dead, and so forth. "Something," she intuits, "is seriously fucked up with this situation." At one point, she attempts to sort out the scrambled events on a hand-drawn calendar grid, but this doesn't clear up all confusion. Key question: will her advance knowledge of the fatal car crash allow her somehow to prevent it? Next question: will her additional knowledge of her husband's amorous dalliance at the office prevent her from wanting to prevent it? Your curiosity may be aroused (if never satisfied), but just as likely it may not. One potential impediment is Sandra Bullock's strange sedation,



and another is director Mennan Yapo's preference for romantic goop over psychic tingle, Julian McMahon, Nia Long, Kate Nelligan, Amber Valletta, Peter Stormare. 2007

Shooter — A new Rambo for a new millennium. Marine Gunnery Sergeant Bob Lee Swagger (a compact, tense, stoic, unswaggering Mark Wahlberg), already abandoned once in the field in Ethiopia, is lured out of mountaintop retirement ostensibly to use his sniper know-how to foil a plot to assassinate the President but in reality to be fitted for a frame. The film, slickly fashioned by Antoine Fuqua, feeds off contradictory pieties of post-9/11: the righteousness of the fighting man (Support Our Troops) and the rottenness of the government (Bring Our Troops Home). "Don't really like the President much," the taciturn hero volunteers, and then broadening the political point, "Didn't like the one before him much, either." (Grunts, good; Com-

manders-in-Chief, bad.) The frightening efficiency, nay, invincibility, of the fighting man is liable to rally less consensus; and as our One-Man Army mows down more foes than you've got fingers and toes, he taxes your credulity if not your patience: two busy hours, action-packed, -crammed, -laden, -clogged. Still, there's sufficient pause for good character bits from Levon Helm as a bluegrass gunsmith and Ned Beatty as a Senatorial slimeball, and there's strong steady support from Michael Peña as

300 — Like Sin City, this takes its material from a "graphic novel" by Frank Miller, and in turn it takes from the film treatment of that one - or to be more precise, director Zack Snyder takes from director Robert Rodriguez - the same, or similar, unnatural light, "virtual" backgrounds, coarsegrained surface, drained color, cadaverous complexions, etc. The same look applied to the same source will obviously not possess the same originality. Sin City, to make a fine distinction, was in black-and-white, sort of, almost, whereas 300 is almost, sort of, in color; but still. (Sky Captain and the World of Tomorrow, without any inspiration from Frank Miller, was an even earlier trailblazer.) The material here is of course quite different, a comic-book retelling of the Battle of Thermopylae, 480 B.C., in which a modest company of Spartan warriors lowered the odds against "the most massive army ever assembled" by funnelling the Persian invaders into the narrow pass known as the Hot Gates. Western democracy, if you please, versus Middle East tyranny, as relevant to our own times as any Bushian gas about "evildoers" and "WMDs." But there is actual, ancient history behind it, too, and accordingly some remedial teaching to be done. "Only the hard and the strong may call themselves Spartans," elucidates the knowing narrator, adding, for the benefit of note-takers or woolgatherers, "Only the hard. Only the strong." (Okay. Got it.) The ensuing gory demonstration of Spartan hardness and strength usefully sums up a juvenile view of manliness - a fantasia of battle scars and washboard stomachs and growling-tiger voices and monstrous adversaries and video-game combat with slow-motion



highlights - and the best to be said of it is that no one will mistake it for history; that the history, unlike the three hundred, will come through the ordeal without a scratch. Or to say the same thing another way, the artistic impact of it is altogether soft and weak. Altogether soft. Altogether weak. A un año de la histórica marcha en San Diego, grupos pro migrantes exigen la pronta aprobación de una reforma migratoria justa, los más afectados, como siempre, los niños, son los que menos culpa tienen en los problemas migratorios

Víctimas de las redadas denunciaron el sufrimiento y temor ante las acciones inhumanas que realizan agentes de inmigración.

"Yo sufro mucho porque mis papás no están conmigo, se los llevaron los agentes, los extraño y no quiero que esto le pase a otros niños", narró triste la pequeña de 8 años, Adíline Muñoz.

LEAD STORY

- Doug Guetzloe, one of central Florida's most prominent political operatives (and a subject of investigations by the Florida Elections Commission and a highway agency in Orlando), had long eluded criminal charges by denying any knowledge of unethical activities that prosecutors were sure he was involved in. However, late last year, Guetzloe missed a payment on his rental storage locker, and 50 boxes of his personal and professional records were seized and auctioned for \$10 to a curious citizen, who then gave them to Orlando's WKMG-TV, which had several earlier investigations of Guetzloe still pending. Based on early readings of the storage-locker papers, Guetzloe was indicted for felony perjury in March, and the case continues.

People With Issues

— A federal appeals court in March turned down Ruth Parks's challenge to her reelection loss in 2001 as the recorder-treasurer of Horseshoe Bend, Ark., which she blamed on a conspiracy by the mayor and police chief. The court concluded that voters, not a conspiracy, had defeated her, perhaps because of the prominence of her belief in UFOs and the conflicting views of her and her husband as to whether she personally had ever been abducted by aliens: She said she hadn't, but her husband said she had, many times, and that the aliens had left scars.

Latest Rights

— Di Yerbury, the retiring vice chancellor of Australia's Macquarie University, is embroiled in a dispute with her successor over her spending habits, leading the successor to seize 1000 pieces of art that Yerbury tried to take with her as she left. She has asserted that many of the works she had on display are her personal property, including a painting of a woman's derriere that she said she posed for 31 years earlier, and she offered in February to have the then-wife of the painter testify that the posterior in the painting is indeed Yerbury's.

- Former pastor and Southern Baptist leader

Lonnie Latham, who had for years prominently preached against homosexuality, was arrested outside a hotel in Oklahoma City in 2006 and charged with soliciting a lewd encounter with a man. But rather than tearfully apologize and enter rehab, Latham demanded a trial to proclaim his constitutional right to engage in consensual sex with an adult male, and in March 2007, he was acquitted.

Ironies

— (1) In January, a news crew for the Milwaukee station WDJT-TV, which was reporting a story on the danger of thin ice covering Big Muskego Lake, watched as their high-tech van's driver mistakenly drove onto the lake and broke through the ice, ruining the expensive vehicle. (2) At a fancy, catered-food affair for the World Social Forum meeting at the five-star Windsor Hotel in Nairobi, Kenya, in January (where participants munched between discussion sessions on, among other topics, world hunger), street kids who normally beg for food money downtown raided the facility and picked the tables clean.

— Mario Sims, 21, had his bail revoked, for a second time by a judge in Racine, Wis., in March, after he cut off his electronic monitoring device and hopped into a limousine to be driven to Chicago in order to be a guest on *The Jerry Springer Show*, where he announced that he will marry his soon-to-arrive baby's mother, who is Sims's half-sister. Sims was also a guest on the show last year, defending his affair with the woman.

News That Sounds Like a Joke

- (1) Students from rival campus organizations at the Dawood Engineering College in Karachi, Pakistan, had fistfights and threw furniture at each other in a January confrontation over which group should get credit for putting up posters urging students not to fight on campus. (2) A condominium on New York City's Upper East Side filed a \$500,000 lawsuit in February against a Subway sandwich shop on the building's first floor, complaining about "nauseating" food odors, but according to a *New York Sun* reporter, the dominant "smell" involved is a scent highly valued by many clear-nosed, non–New Yorkers: fresh-baked bread.

Are We Safe?

- (1) The Department of Homeland Security's inspector general revealed in March that, although 52 teams are at work tracking down foreigners who remain in the country even after being ordered out, the agency still has a backlog of 620,000 of these fugitive aliens. (However, the inspector general also admitted that there are not enough jail cells to detain that many fugitives, anyway.) (2) In February, after a three-month court battle, Indian national Mohammed Yousuf Mullawala, 28, was ordered deported for submitting false documents to authorities after his visa expired. He originally attracted attention at a truck-driving school in Smithfield, R.I., where he was allegedly curious about buying dangerous chemicals. Also, while seemingly intent on learning to drive a big rig, he was reportedly uninterested in learning how to back one up. · In March, a 35-year-old Iraqi national was detained at Los Angeles International Airport after security workers discovered a half-inch magnet, wrapped in gum and inside a napkin, tied by a coiled wire and housed in his rectum. He was released after he convinced investigators that he is merely a practitioner of therapeutic uses of magnets. (Earlier in 2007, The Lancet medical journal published a doctor's letter to inform security officials that patients with perianal sepsis are typically treated by inserting suture material, knotted on one end but with the other extending outside the anus, a sight that might suggest to security monitors that drugs or explosives were at the other end of the string.)

Least Competent Criminals

— (1) Two Bulgarian nationals were arrested in San Marcos, Texas, in January after being caught allegedly robbing coin-change machines at an apartment complex, and police subsequently found apartment guides for several cities in their © 200

van, along with a half-ton of quarters (\$18,700). (2) Kevin Russell, 21, was arrested in Hobart, Ind., in February when he went to a Chase Bank and tried to cash a Bank One check for \$50,000. The check was signed, "King Savior, King of Kings, Lord of Lords, Servant."

Recurring Themes

— Traditional Chinese celebrations have been mentioned several times in "News of the Weird," including the annual Tombsweeping Festival in April, which calls on people to visit relatives' graves and leave offerings that will improve the afterlives of the deceased. Actual objects (such as jewelry and money) are no longer required, as paper representations are considered just as effective. This year, according to an Agence France-Presse dispatch, paper illustrations of dancing girls will adorn many graves, along with paper "Viagra" pills (and even more questionably, paper renditions of condoms).

Compelling Explanations

— "[Death row] is the calmest place I've ever been in," said convicted murderer Paul John Fitzpatrick in March to a judge in Largo, Fla., hoping to avoid a mere life sentence, which would place him in the general prison population. "I probably found the most peace I've ever had in my whole life [in his previous experience] on death row," he said. "It's just a hell of a lot easier...doing time with murderers than it is with fools." (A decision was still pending at press time.)

— In January, Georgia's devout governor, Sonny Perdue, ignored religion as the reason he supports the state's Sunday no-beer-sales law (and religion would be a constitutionally impermissible basis for the law, anyway). Rather, Perdue said, the real beauty of the Sunday law is merely to force Georgians to manage their time better, by getting everyone to finish their shopping for spirits by Saturday.



FIFTEEN FEET FROM NATALIE

My interest in Natalie Portman began when I saw a trailer for Mars Attacks. I was 16. I didn't know who she was, but her almond eyes and aquiline nose caught my attention. I did research and found that she had appeared in a few films. After renting them, I was at an impasse. Mars Attacks had not yet been released, and I had exhausted her brief oeuvre.

Around this time, the term "world wide web" was becoming a part of the American lexicon. During a visit to my computer-equipped mother's home, I found that others shared my interest in Natalie and had built shrines to her on the Internet. I read all the interviews I could and discovered evidence that further fueled my obsession. Like me, Natalie was a 16-year-old junior in high school, a vegetarian of many years, and found the word "clutter" to be pleasing to the ear. I felt a common bond with her. All the older men taking an interest in the 16-year-old girl sickened me. It was okay for me to be interested in her; in fact, if one were to take stock of the evidence, I had many good reasons to be infatuated. She was meant for me, not all those other crazy, creepy guys. I knew what I had to do. I needed to go to New York to meet Natalie.

After coming to this conclusion, I attempted to hatch a plan to get to New York. I had many fantasies about hitchhiking there, spending a few days with some nonexistent artist friends, and just happening to see Natalie at a local pizza parlor. We would hit it off immediately, and she would bring me home to her artist mother and obstetrician father. Initially, they would be skeptical of my atheism, yet sensing their daughter's feelings, they would decide to reserve judgment. I

would help her rehearse for auditions, and she would provide the muse for my inner writer.

But reality sunk in: I lived 3000 miles away and could no sooner afford a trip to New York than I could a new pair of shoes.

A few months later, word came that the pilgrimage might actually come to fruition. My aunt offered to take me to New York City with her during spring break. I jumped at the chance. A quick look at queenamidalasplace.com verified what I had suspected: Natalie would be performing on Broadway in The Diary of Anne Frank.

I was worried that I wouldn't be able to convince my Aunt to see the tragic play, but she was game. And so it was that I ended up sitting 15 feet away from Natalie Portman for more than two hours. I couldn't believe my good fortune. After the show, I was surprised to discover that we had chosen a night when the cast would answer questions from the audience. Initially, Natalie didn't appear on stage, and my heart sank. I

was starting to worry that "select members of the cast" did not include her. But then she came out. She was giggly and acted like the teenage girl she was, yet she answered questions thoughtfully and professionally. My crush reached its highest point.

The next day I resolved to write Natalie a letter expressing how I felt. I tried



to formulate the right combination of words that would warrant a response. I cringe now to even think of the specifics of the mash note I later delivered to the play's stage manager. Needless to say, she never replied. But at the time, I was convinced she would write me back

after returning home, a hand-written envelope with a New York return address arrived in the mail. I allowed myself to be excited for a few seconds and then ripped open the envelope to find a brochure from Columbia College that I had requested while in New York.

My disappointment eventually evolved into disinterest. I stopped going to

websites dedicated to Natalie, and 1999's Anywhere But Here was the last film I saw solely because she was in it. As she and I both began to become adults, my infatuation came to an end. I wanted the cuter, younger version of her, but she was long gone. As that form of

her began to mature and change, so did the part of me that was so obsessed with her — she was left with severely prominent cheekbones, and I no longer have the ability to harbor celebrity crushes of such magnitude.





I get frustrated hearing people talk about how Second Life isn't entertaining or that it's only useful for advertising to "freaks, furries, ageplay perverts, and prank-loving adolescents." I decided to put together a list of things to do in Second Life as a resource for people curious about the game and something I can point to next time I read one of those misguided attacks.

I don't really blame the people who think there's nothing to do in Second Life. One of the areas where Second Life is weakest is in introducing newcomers to the world. The user interface is confusing, and, worse, once you've got that mastered, it's hard to figure out what to do. The newbie is confronted with an array of cybersex areas, online casinos, and sleazy make-moneyfast schemes. But, once you get past that initial barrier, you'll find plenty of things to do in Second Life.

1. Talk to other people. I interviewed one Second Life skeptic who dismissed SL, saying it's just a chatroom with graphics. But that's actually one of its strengths. The 3D nature of Second Life allows me to suspend disbelief and be somewhere else, not at my desk staring at a screen. I can chat in Second Life for quite some time, exchanging jokes or having deeper discussions with friends.

2. Dancing. Here's how it works: You send your avatar off to an SL dance club or bar. There's music playing - it's streaming audio that

plays over your PC speakers. Everybody hears the same music. You click on a "dance ball," and away you go - your avatar starts dancing, with all the other dancing avatars. Sure, it looks silly, but that's part of the fun. And while you're dancing, you're engaged in text chat with the other dancers around you.

3. Building and creating things. People spend huge amounts of time in Second Life building and scripting houses and furniture and especially clothing and avatars. Users write scripts to control how the avatar moves. They create vehicles to drive or fly around or through Second Life.

4. Doing business. You can make real-world money in Second Life. But that's not what I'm talking about here. Most of the people in business in Second Life aren't making any significant amounts of money at all. Business is a game in Second Life.

The amounts of money changing hands are pretty small. You can buy a nice suit of clothes in SL for about a buck and a quarter. You can buy a house for less than ten bucks

Doing business in Second Life has many of the same benefits that it has in the real world. To do business, you have to talk to other peo-



ple. In SL as in RL, you have to find a place to sell your stuff; you have to advertise it and market it; you have to deal with customers.

Consider a Second Life dance hall: Somebody built it (more likely a team of somebodys). They employ DJs who are spinning music over streaming audio. The dance hall will employ hosts and

hostesses to make guests feel welcome. There are often people who work security, to guard against inworld pranksters known as "griefers." All these people are building community by talking and working together and having fun. The employees — DJs, hosts and

> hostesses, and security guards - are mostly in it for fun, role-playing at having jobs.

5. Shopping. With all those people building clothes and avatars and vehicles and things, Second Life has plenty of shops, and you can while away many pleasant hours committing SL retail. I like to do it alone, but many people do it with friends, same as shopping in the real world.

6. Role-playing games. The Second Life variety of RPG is half improvisational theater and half reenactment (like Civil War reenactors in real life). Players behave and move in character and interact with each other. Examples: Midian is sort of like Sin City or Bladerunner with vampires and hellhounds.

The activity in Midian sometimes involves cybersex, so be warned. Roma is a reenactment of the pageantry, holidays, and gladiator combat of ancient Rome. Tombstone recreates the cowboy town of Tombstone, AZ, at the time of the gunfight at the OK Corral.

7. Other kinds of games. You can find WoW/Everquest-style fantasy games in SL, as well as shoot-'emups, and even quidditch, from the Harry Potter novels. The other night, while wandering around SL, I found a delightful bowling alley, with one of those futuristic spaceage signs that were so popular in the real world in the 1950s.

8. See the sights. Sightseeing is one of my favorite things to do. Just wander around Second Life. exploring and looking at all the beautiful things users have built. How do you know where to go? Well, you can ask people. The SL search tool, which is part of the software client, has a list of popular places, along with their coordinates. You can also search on keywords. When you're going somewhere, don't take the most direct route. Wander and look around a bit. Or just click places on the game map at random and see where you end up.

9. Sailing. The Nantucket Yacht Club and other in-game venues offer sailing in Second Life. Capture the virtual winds and cruise around the world.

10. Surfing. You can get a virtual surfboard in Second Life and hang ten on the digital waves.





<u>By John Brizzolara</u>

George Orwell once said something to the effect (which is why I won't put quotes around it, but I need to attribute it to him) that, ahem, deciding to write a novel is to deliberately undergo a prolonged illness, un-ahem. This strikes me as very true and puts me in the odd position of having been in touch with an editor who tells me, "I like it so far. I need to see more, completed if possible," which is like hearing the doctor say, "Great outbreak of psoriasis. See me when it gets worse, kills you, or damn near anyway." You've got to do it because this guy is one of the best at your type of disease. You'd normally never get an appointment with him if yours weren't a particularly interesting set of symptoms.

So, to get my effects in order...forget financially; that way will always lay chaos and never stopped me before. The fact that I already have a (mostly) fulltime job is not a drawback either; again, it didn't stop me the first four times. Actually, make that three times. The third novel was my only paying job at the time. "Oh, really?" I can hear certain readers; "Where are these so-called novels by...(peering at the byline on this column) 'Brizolxkszzio? I didn't see them by the Dean Grishams and the James Mitchums and the Henry Mailers, and,

oh yeah, the Stephen King section." That's because they were all into and out of print during the big Halley's Comet hubbub and got lost in all the excitement. But they did get written and one way or another got out there.

Raymond Chandler had a method for self-discipline that involved sitting in front of the typewriter for an hour (I believe it was) every day; and while he did not have to work on his fiction, he forbade himself from doing anything else. He could not write a check or a letter, could not pare his nails, etc. I assume he allowed himself to smoke and — during certain periods of his life — to drink. Well, I have to sit here anyway by virtue of job #2 (or it could be considered job #2b) and during downtime from that task (about 45 minutes out of the hour), if I do not write a column or something else for the paper, I must work on the novel. When this sounds like asking a lot from myself, I think of my friend Chano, a Tijuana resident and La Jolla restaurant worker who does more every day by noon than most people do in a week. In fact, if I were to use Chano as a protagonist in a novel (which is not a bad idea), I can just hear the editor say, "I don't know. Is the reader going to believe somebody actually does all this stuff even before he gets to work?

Budgeting time has given way to the next order of difficulty, which Colin Wilson calls the Paradoxical Nature of Freedom, and I will butcher if I try to paraphrase here (Wilson has filled volumes with similes, metaphors, analogies) but it has to do with that buoyant, first-day-of-a-holiday feeling turning to boredom and a sense of futility. Also, there is Wilson's radical suggestion (somewhat differently put than other existentialists) that the ordinary state of human consciousness is a kind of depression. You see, I have amassed an ingenious arsenal of obstacles, antipersonnel weapons to prevent me from doing anything as pretentiously fancy-pants as writing a novel. I have my mother's long generations of Calvinist moral objections to it and my Chicago upbringing telling me that writing novels is a gateway activity to drinking beer out of a glass and then styling the hair of my male friends while wearing hot pants.

There is one powerful antidote for all of this, however, and that is a story. I must tell a story to myself that I hunger for and is simply not available anywhere else. Finding that hunger is where the intellectual minefields are, and

here it is best to just close your eyes and use the force. If when you open your eyes, you find you have written Clone Jedi of Tatooine, well then, there you go.

Someone - Norman Mailer? No, Mario Puzo - once compared novelwriting to safecracking. The idea was that you could spend years with your ear to the tumbler, then one day crack that combination, the door swings open, and you are allowed to type — only it's nothing anyone wants to read, maybe not even you.

A story consists of a series of what-happens-next reactions in the person to whom you're telling the story, and at first that's you. So as I hold out an imagined event to myself like a carrot on a fishing line just a few paces before me, instead of asking me, "How's the novel going?" Please, God, not that. Ask, instead: "Catch anything today?"


