



Now you see her The wife of Steve Peace, the former Democratic state assemblyman and



senator most famous for his role in the disastrous state utility deregulation follies of the 1990s and now chief political advisor to Padres owner John Moores, has managed to get back onto the state's Integrated Waste Management Board, a taxpayerfunded post paying \$117,818 a year. Fifty-three-year-old Cheryl

Peace, first appointed to the position in 2003 by then senate president pro tempore John Burton, a close chum of her husband's, departed the board early this year after her four-year term expired. Current Pro Tem Don Perata anointed former state senator Wes Chesbro of Arcata, an eight-year veteran of the board before he was elected to the senate, to fill the spot vacated by Peace.

This time around, Peace, a registered Republican who once worked as a cost analyst at now-



defunct Rohr Corporation and a loan officer for Bank of America, owes her appointment to Democratic Assembly Speaker Fabian Núñez. "Cheryl Peace has been an energetic and effective member of the Integrated Waste Management Board," Núñez Fabian Núñez said in a June 21 news release announcing the move. "Her

experience will be invaluable in continuing the board's important environmental mandate." Besides the two members chosen by the senate and assembly leaders, the other four spots are picked by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, who once vowed to abolish the board — which ostensibly oversees such things as local trash recycling efforts — as a costly political boundoggle used to pay off cronies and contributors. Steve Peace's boss Moores has been a big contributor to state Democrats; in March of last year he kicked in \$45,000 to the state party.

Meanwhile, the Peaces have been busy in local real estate. According to a deed recorded on June 6, Peace, his wife, mother Patricia, stepfather Grigsby Gordon Browning, and some family trusts purchased a commercial building on F Street in downtown Chula Vista for \$5 million. The deal was financed with a \$3.36 million loan made by David Malcolm, the mortgage broker, ex-port commissioner, and longtime Peace buddy. In 2003 Malcolm pleaded guilty to a felony conflict-of-interest count for taking \$210,000 in "consulting" fees while trying to broker a deal for Duke Energy to lease the South Bay Power Plant from the Port District. Records released at his sentencing included an account of a December 1998 dinner Malcolm had at posh Rainwater's restaurant with then-Senator Peace and Duke executives. Malcolm charged the \$432 tab to the Port District.

Airport," "Limo Cab fare to hotel in San Diego" are among the expenses listed in a \$809.73 entry for January 21 of this year. Total costs in January were \$70,351.33. On February 7, the report attributed \$1039.60 to "Travel & Related Expenses for Walter St. Onge's airfare ticket." On February 13, a \$935.72 expenditure by St. Onge, one of Keller's legal associates, included "Dinner with Stan Keller," "Breakfast with Stan Keller and Jay Goldstone," and "Various tips throughout the trip." Grand total in February: \$63,608.23.

On March 20, St. Onge was reimbursed \$880.41 for such items as "Meals Coffee; Meals Dinner; Hotel the Westgate Hotel."

Of course, there was also some work involved. For instance, on April 25, it took 3.3 hours for Keller to "Prepare work plan and budget; prepare Audit Committee guidance; review City Attorney Report on internal controls," and have "discussions regarding Interim Report number 15." At Keller's hourly rate of \$700, that session cost \$2310. At the end of a hard day, it was back to an unidentified hotel for St. Onge. "Dinner-\$31.49; pink lemonade-\$2.90" were among costs included in a \$1295.93 expenditure for St. Onge, dated April 25. The total for April was \$63,364.22.

he convention center deal between Chula Vista and Nashville's Gaylord Entertainment has apparently collapsed. People

are wringing their hands. They should be clapping their hands. Chula Vista and the Port could not afford the heavily subsidized proposal that was on

and is loaded with debt. Its hotel business — the overwhelming bulk of the company — is softening.

Now there is talk that the

ity Attorney Mike Aguirre is getting threatening letters. There is nothing new about that, except that these have come

from purported law enforcement agencies.

On July 17, Aguirre got a hand-delivered letter from the district attorney's office. According to chief deputy district attorney Julie Korsmeyer, the office is looking into the land deal in which ballpark czar Mike Madigan and his partner Paul Nieto turned a quick \$500,000 profit on downtown land by posing as agents of the San Diego Community College District. The city attorney's office has been investigating the deal for some time. The district attorney's office has refused to say publicly if it is doing so. Aguirre's efforts "may seriously impede our investigation into potential felony

charges," warned Korsmeyer. "Your actions may cause the tainting or loss of crucial evidence" sought by her office. Parallel investigations are not unusual. There is good reason to believe that the district attorney's office will bury — not investigate the Madigan/Nieto matter.

On July 12, Aguirre got a letter from one Gary W. Schons, senior assistant attorney general in San Diego. This harks back to one of the sillier events of recent San Diego history. A letter from Aguirre to the Union-Tribune appeared on June 15, explaining why Mayor Jerry Sanders's actions in the Sunroad matter were corrupt. Then Sanders, surrounded by law enforcement

officials including District Attorney Bonnie Dumanis, said he would ask the attorney general to look into Aguirre's charge. In a letter of June 22, Schons demanded that Aguirre parse his words in that June 15 letter. The July 12 missive commanded Aguirre to respond. Aguirre doesn't intend to do so. Schons may learn of that in this Reader story. One day even Sanders and Schons may learn that under U.S. laws political polemics is protected — even encouraged. ■

Willful Blindness To Golden Hill

embers of the Greater Golden Hill Community Development Corporation recently discovered a ruse that might

help them overcome opposition to assessing their fellow citizens nearly \$489,000 in increased taxes. Heretofore the development corporation has not been able to muster enough support from property owners to bring the matter to a vote. Thirty percent of owners in the proposed dis-

process get started. What the private, nonprofit development corporation wants is a "maintenance assess-

ment district," a device that has become popular in recent years to finance local community improvements. Under California law, a maintenance assessment district (MAD)

trict are needed. But Scott Kessler, deputy director of San Diego's Economic Development Division, is now saying that the interest of 30 percent of the citizens is not required for a vote to go forward. That's because the development corporation, he says, didn't apply for City money to help the

must confer special benefits on its citizens' real property above and beyond the general benefits the City already provides. Examples might be several trash pickups per month beyond regular trash collection or putting streetlights in dark neighborhoods.

According to retired attor-

ney Hal Tyvoll, who was on the development corporation's board in 2000, the effort to establish a maintenance assessment district in Greater Golden Hill began back then. The area includes Golden Hill, South Park, Brooklyn Heights, Orange Park, Morse, Seaman, and Choates. "The organizing center at that time," Tyvoll tells me, "was the 25th Street and 28th Street corridors in Golden Hill, especially where they cross Broadway. The services they wanted were more appropriately provided by a 'business improvement district,' though they weren't using that term. The problem they had, however, was that the businesses in the area didn't want to pay for the services. So [the development corporation] looked for ways to expand the revenue base outward."

Tyvoll shows me the development corporation's meeting minutes from July 26, 2000. Its chairman was none other than Golden Hill resident Scott Kessler, and one of its board members was Golden Hill businessman Rob Fanella, the organization's current chairman. A subcommittee had the responsibility of studying the maintenance assessment district. The subcommittee, called the Golden Hill Commercial Revitalization and Economic Development, seemed devoted to economic interests in Golden Hill exclusively.

The meeting minutes show that members discussed "the Proposal for Organization of

Golden Hill Property Owners into a Community Maintenance Assessment District submitted by Marco LiMandri of New City America." LiMandri was a consultant to the group. His company, New City America, specializes in setting up business improvement districts and maintenance assessment districts.

The biggest problem the development corporation was facing that night was how to raise enough money to proceed. The meeting minutes record the following: "Everyone felt that the proposed district should include the entire [Greater Golden Hill] Planning Area as it was unlikely there was enough mass to fund a MAD without including all the households in Golden Hill."

Eventually, in 2002, the development corporation sent out a survey to the over 3500 Greater Golden Hill property owners to see how many would support the maintenance assessment district. The positive response was approximately 14 percent, nowhere near the 30 percent the City requires. And that was the end of the effort for the time being.

"In the meantime," claims Tyvoll, "Marco LiMandri managed to insinuate himself into the legislative process." Tyvoll shows me a September 30, 2002 letter LiMandri wrote to a City Land Use and Housing Committee criticizing the limitations of maintenance assessment districts. Legislation governing them, wrote LiMandri, "is not responsive to the growing needs of San Diego. The Maintenance Assessment

District ordinance adopted by the City Council in 1998 does not provide for the funding of...economic development or marketing and promotional activities....

"The one group that is geared to coordinate such activities, the City's [Business Improvement District Council], does not make provision for property owners' inclusion in their membership....

"Finally, BIDs...only assess business license holders." At the end of his letter, LiMandri indicated several sources for his thinking. "I took [some that the understanding of maintenance "improvements be interpreted liberally."

The current appearance of the maintenance assessment district initiative in Greater Golden Hill began in April with a new property-owner survey. The results were almost identical to the first survey about a 14 percent positive response. But in May, District Eight councilman Ben Hueso gave the development corporation \$45,000 in federal community development block grant funds to get the maintenance assessment district

LiMandri wrote his letter, urges

The City and the company had been negotiating for a year. Gaylord wanted to build a hotel with 2000 rooms and 400,000 square feet of convention space that would be marketed greatly to organizations that want to keep their convention and attendees under one roof. Gaylord operates such facilities in the Nashville, Orlando, and Dallas markets and is building one in Prince George's County, Maryland, to serve the nation's capital. These hotels constitute 96 percent of Gaylord's business. The Grand Ole Opry and related enterprises make up the rest.

"I looked at the Gaylord letter of intent, and it was pretty clear to me that it was a risky project for [Chula Vista]," says Scott Barnett, president and founder of TaxpayersAdvocate.org. Chula Vista and/or the Port were looking into the sale of \$308 million in bonds to subsidize the deal. "The Port or City or both would have to come up with \$25 million a year to cover the debt service. To get \$25 million out of the project, you have to have \$2.5 billion worth of new, private development."

Gaylord planned to put \$750 million-plus into the project. With the public sector putting in a bit more than \$300 million, "The Gaylord hotel project would only have generated \$7 million to \$7.5 million of tax increment," says Barnett. "So that means that the other \$18 million of debt service had to come from other sources such as sales tax, hotel tax, or \$1.5 billion of private bayfront development."

CITY LIGHTS

And Chula Vista is in over its head already. Last October, Barnett issued a report titled "Chula Vista — The Looming Fiscal Crisis." Among many things, the study pointed out that the City's revenues have soared the past four years, but spending has risen even more rapidly. The inevitable result: deficits. The bureaucracy has burgeoned, and the average management salary in October was \$131,400. The pension debt tripled over two years, and the City's debt zoomed by \$143 million in five years.

In the ten fiscal years ended in 2005, Chula Vista's revenues jumped from \$98.1 million to \$233 million, but spending increased more rapidly, from \$108.7 million to \$256 million. In the four years ended last year, the City ran a deficit of \$21 million, reducing general fund emergency reserves to balance the budget. By the end of last year, the emergency reserves were down to 6 percent of expenditures; the city council's target reserve policy is 8 percent.

The City has increased its debt by \$143 million in the past half-decade. It's now up to \$190 million. Chula Vista has added 256 employees since 2001 and boosted bureaucracy pay and benefits. The City has \$13 million in pension obligation bonds that it first floated in 1994. Such bonds are poison, because they don't go to building a bridge or a school or something that would make the economy more productive but simply shift an obligation onto future generations.

Gaylord is not much better off. Largely because it has lost money heavily in four of its last six years, "Earnings are insufficient to cover fixed

munity, landscaping along streets, cleaning up canyons, placing and emptying trash cans on major streets, and providing community banners and street signage.

A number of these items, says Hal Tyvoll, do not qualify as benefits to real property. "They may, incidentally, increase property values," he says, "but that's not a goal of maintenance assessment districts. The problem we have is that not even city officials seem to understand the difference between maintenance assessment districts and business improvement districts. By California law, the two are totally different animals. Take community banners, for instance. They would be appropriately provided by a business improvement district, since that mechanism is a more open-ended way to generally enhance the business climate of an area. And it is not bound by the requirement to provide special benefits to real property. In the Greater Golden Hill plan, however, the two types of district are being mixed up."

Something that surprised local residents is that the area of the newly proposed maintenance assessment district has greatly expanded since 2002. That territory was based on the Greater Golden Hill Planning Area, which has the rough appearance of a backwards L-shape. This year's proposed district is bigger than that. The size seemingly grew from somebody drawing a straight line from the top of the L to its westward horizontal wing. The effect is to include in the new district the City-owned Balboa Park property on which parts of two golf courses sit.

Kathy Vandenheuvel, a development corporation board member, e-mails me that the Balboa Park land was included to address several concerns local residents had about it. Among other goals,

proponents of the maintenance assessment district, says Vandenheuvel, want "to remove illegally dumped large items and debris from the hillsides overlooking [26th] Street, [which winds through the park]. These hillsides are Cityowned and part of the park, but the MAD could not clean these hills of illegally dumped items unless they were included in [its] boundaries. Canyon beautification is part of [the district's] scope of services." Proponents also want the community to clean the park and canyons of "debris left by the transient population."

But opponents see a more sinister motivation. Every property parcel in the affected area gets a vote in the current election, and the votes are "weighted" according to the amount of the properties' assessments. If you and I have property in the district and yours is twice the size of mine, you will be assessed twice as much as me, and your vote will count twice as much.

The City's policy is always to vote in favor of creating new maintenance assessment districts. It already owned 93 voting parcels in the district before the addition of the Balboa Park property, which is one large parcel. The effect of including this huge new parcel, therefore, is to add enormous weight to the City's vote. A simple comparison of the Balboa Park parcel size with

that of an average resident's property reveals a startling difference. The voting weight of this one city parcel would cancel out hundreds of residential parcels' votes against the maintenance assessment district.

On June 12, the development corporation talked the city council into authorizing a balloting process in Greater Golden Hill. Eighth District councilman Ben Hueso presented the motion in less than a minute, and the remaining councilmembers asked no questions. The City Clerk sent out ballots, and they will be counted after a final city council hearing on July 30. Approval of the new maintenance assessment district will require 50 percent, plus one vote, of the weighted vote. The development corporation's chances are good if the same property owners who participated in the survey are the ones who vote. Seventy-five percent of them, or 14 percent of the district's property owners, said they wanted a maintenance assessment district.

But wait. "Why," asks South Park resident Cindy Funkhouser, "are they not following the rules?" I meet with Funkhouser, a medical editor, and her husband Ed in the Los Reyes taco shop near 25th and Broadway. "This thing has turned my life upside down," she says. "I first learned we might be assessed for a maintenance district about three weeks ago, shortly after the June 12 city council hearing. Since then I've been studying everything I can get my hands on that's relevant to it."

What Funkhouser discovered is that there's a clearly outlined procedure for establishing maintenance assessment districts in the city. Applicants for a district must apply through the San Diego Park and Recreation Department, which announces on its website the requirement that 30 percent of the property owners sign a petition supporting a district. The department also publishes what's commonly called the "MAD Formation Handout," which emphasizes the citizen participation guaranteed in the 30 percent requirement. In a parenthetical note, the handout states: "The formation of any proposed commercial MAD districts to be managed by a non-profit organization pursuant to San Diego Municipal Code...is handled by the Community and Economic Development Department" (italics added). That's Scott Kessler's office.

"But we are residential mixed use," Funkhouser writes me. "So the Golden Hill corporation should have gone through Park and Rec. Instead, they went straight to Scott Kessler, who handles commercial maintenance assessment and business improvement districts."

Funkhouser complained to Kessler, who on July 3 wrote her a long letter. Kessler based his response on a San Diego City Council policy called "Funding for Maintenance Assessment District Formation." That policy, he argued,

"does...require a petition process necessitating a 30 [percent] showing of affected property owners favoring MAD formation, only if the district proponent wishes to borrow from a certain revolving loan fund the City set up specifically to fund formation campaigns.... The Park and Recreation Department's 'MAD Formation Handout'...also states that a 30 [percent] showing is required when an entity is seeking access specifically to the City's revolving loan

fund." A week later, Funkhouser wrote back, challenging Kessler's interpretation of city council policy. That policy "was written in September 2004 using the...MAD Formation Handout, which is the only and prevailing formation protocol.... The MAD Formation Handout does not state that the 30 percent-petition is only required for Fund users...."

One other claim in Kessler's July 3 letter is worth noting. "The...[development corporation]...had initiated this proposed formation as a 'selfmanaged' MAD. That is why it was assigned to my Department. The Park and Recreation Department...manages those districts that are managed by the City. Our Department deals only with the selfmanaged districts. (Incidentally, I joined the City in May of 2006 after the Golden Hill...campaign had already been initiated and assigned to the former Department's man-

But Funkhouser conceded

nothing to Kessler. "In your Request for Council Action...," she wrote, "there is no reference to self-management. None at all. Further, self-management status isn't determined by the process of application; it is determined by vote, at the ballot stage." Indeed, an examination of the ballot reveals that after a person votes on the maintenance assessment district, the next choice is who shall manage the district, the City of San Diego or the Greater Golden Hill Community Development Corporation.

I ask Funkhouser if she believes Kessler has a conflict of interest in the case. "Probably," she says, "but I'm not fighting on that basis. All I want them to do is follow the rules. If they can get a maintenance assessment district that way, then fine. But when I bring up the rules, the whole City ignores me. I sent copies of all my correspondence to Kessler's superiors — William Anderson, Jim Waring, the mayor — and I got no answers. So it looks like they all support his approach. I ran across a funny legal term recently — 'willful blindness.' That's what

On Wednesday of last week, the Greater Golden Hill Community Development Corporation held a public information meeting at the Albert Einstein Academy in South Park. Councilman Hueso attended and answered most of the questions, which he requested be submitted ahead of time in writing. Cindy and Ed Funkhouser sat in the back

row holding up signs expressing their point of view. As the meeting started, they shouted down the speakers until other attendees shouted them down.

The following day, I received an e-mail from Cindy Funkhouser. "I just didn't want the whole time...to be wasted on powerpoints and bureaucratic bull. So, I decided to go on the offensive immediately. My mamma didn't raise me that way, but sometimes you just have to shoot first.

"And, a lot of people haven't spent the kind of time I have spent becoming aware of the fraud, so I understand that they are open to the possibility that this might be fair and honest. It's too late for decorum, for me."

Meanwhile, Scott Kessler sent one more letter. He sympathized with Funkhouser as being "uninitiated" in the relevant laws. He then argued that the "MAD Formation Handout" "is not the Municipal Code or Council policy." But even the council policy Kessler uses to support his position directs a mixed-use or residential district start-up to follow the Park and Recreation protocol, which includes the 30 percent approval. The policy says that Kessler's Economic Development Division is to handle commercial districts.

According to attorney Hal Tyvoll, by processing a mixeduse or residential district, "Kessler is inventing his own policy, de facto, which omits all the spending restrictions and safeguards for public participation." ■

Why are cinnamon candies "red hot"? I have never thought the taste of a cinnamon roll or other baked good was particularly eye watering.

Tastes that bludgeon our senses have always been popular, and the perp in the case of cinnamon is cinnamic aldehyde, the chief constituent of cinnamon oil. Our taste buds have components that are stimulated by touch (pain, heat, cold), not just taste. Cinnamon (like chili, mint, ginger, for example) goes straight for the touch receptors. Where did the expression "nothing to sneeze at" come from? It obviously means something important but makes absolutely no sense.

Where did the expression "railroaded" come from?

This time we got smart and posted several elves outside the word nerds' office window so they couldn't scram when they heard us coming. As it turns out, they took the "railroaded" question, made a paper airplane out of it, and chucked it over the elves' heads, so we don't have a real answer for that one. But we'll answer it anyway, natch.

The ordinary noun "railroad" has been around since the late 1700s. Came to the U.S. that way, while the Brits reverted to "railway." So our first guess is the term is American, not British. "Railroaded," the verb, appeared in print in the 1880s, a time when railroads played a big part in people's personal and business lives. It first meant to try a defendant in a rigged court with a quick and dirty trial that leads directly to jail. So with no help from the word nerds, we figure it came from the idea of some poor guy being put on a train, having no control over his destination. We can imagine some colorful newspaper reporter coining the phrase, or having it come from a popular novel of the time, or even out of the courts themselves. Hey, this word-origin business isn't so hard. Of course, anyone with real information is encouraged to jump in.

The word guys do believe they know where *spitting image* came from. For many centuries, there have been lots of spit-based phrases that mean "an exact likeness between two people." And apparently the spit in question is real spit. The two people are so alike, it's as if one person spit out the other. The original phrase was "spitten image" — "spitten" is an old form of the past participle of "spit." It gradually migrated to "spitting image," which doesn't seem any more sensible than the original. See? Ask the experts, you get junk like that. The elves make up stuff, and you get a lively treatise on Victorian sociology and jurisprudence. Which would you really rather read?

At least with "nothing to sneeze at" we've got a good plot, goofy characters, and an explanation that we can swallow. Or inhale, as the case may be. The original phrase was "not to be sneezed at," meaning something that is significant, important. So get in the wayback machine and head for 17th-century England. Sneezing is a fad, said to clear the brain and make a person more alert. Rather than wait around for nature to generate a sneeze, wouldn't it be great if we could sneeze at will and always be at the top of our game? Enter snuff: tobacco, herbs, or a blend of the two. A pinch in the nose and you're one sneeze closer to brilliance. This became a status symbol, of course, since the proles were all scrabbling around trying to feed their kids while the gentry hung out in the solarium blowing their noses. Sneezing at will was all the rage in men's clubs and with after-dinner brandy. But a harmless fad turned ugly when at these gatherings people started huffing snuff and sneezing as a sign of contempt. What better way to say, "You fool, I won't listen to this nonsense anymore" than to interrupt the speaker with a loud sneeze. I guess the fool's defense was, "Well, my point is not to be sneezed at."

I have to admit, this story sounds like one of those "folk etymologies" I'm always raving on about — a story that's made up after the fact that is fun, interesting, logical, but complete bunk. But in this case, some very respected word-history scholars buy the explanation, so we will too.



Trust Me

ou know things are bad when, as of Monday afternoon, NBA.com had no news about Tim Donaghy, the recently retired referee and alleged mob connected game fixer, save for a two-paragraph Friday press release from Commissioner Stern. Not one story. Not one column.

The news that a NBA referee is alleged to be involved in fixing games should not be a surprise to the NBA. According to a story in the New York Daily News, the league hired a private investigator a year and a half ago to look into Donaghy and gambling. They looked. They found. One local reported that "Donaghy bet on golf games, neighborhood poker games and at an Atlantic City casino."

Even if that turns out to be neighborhood

gossip and untrue, placing the word "bet" in the same sentence as "Donaghy" is more than enough to get your attention. Then add a 2005 lawsuit by neighbor Peter Mansueto, who claimed he was harassed by Donaghy for, according to the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, yelling obscenities, setting fire to the Mansuetos' tractor and crashing the family's golf cart into a ravine. I have to admit that sounds like fun, but it is

considered a crime in many jurisdictions.

Donaghy was suspended from Radley Run Country Club in 2004 for chasing his neighbor's wife around the golf course while shouting obscenities. Again, sounds like fun.

Donaghy was charged in June 2002 with disorderly conduct and harassment of his postman. Apparently Mr. Donaghy looked on as a federal employee carelessly knocked over a bin of recycled trash in front of, or perhaps on, his property. This caused Donaghy to emit a mighty scream, mount his car, and, according to postman Charles Brogan, "He kept cutting me off... At one point he got out of his car and started threatening me face to face."

In 1995, Donaghy was charged with harassing and stalking Dennis Van Zandt in Haverton Township, Pennsylvania.

But I'm starting to repeat myself and that's unbecoming since everybody is working so well together. Tim, (we can call him Tim now) resigned from the NBA on July 9, and it's good timing that he did because now, when all the stories are written, Tim will be referred to as a "former referee." That sounds so much better and is factually accurate to boot!

I wonder if Tim began his resignation letter with, "I want to spend more time with my family," a reasonable explanation given his salary of \$260,000 for a part-time job. Media


reports say that Tim's arrest is *scheduled* for sometime this week. And isn't it nice to schedule these things in advance what with our busy lives? And reports say "two mob associates" may be arrested this week. Or maybe not. We'll check our calendars.

We're talking two years, two seasons of basketball. The feds overheard Tim's name while wiretapping the mob on another matter. That's how this started. The NBA did not initiate anything. Stern said at his Tuesday news conference that the first time he heard about this was June 21 of this year.

But they had to know, at least parts of NBA World. The NBA records every call a referee makes. They have an observer at every game. There is a supervisor of officials. NBA refs work

in three-man teams. Referees working with Tim would know something was wrong because they were there when he made his phantom calls. There must have been rumors.

Tim worked into the second round of the playoffs this year, which is considered an atta-boy from the league. It's the official stamp: "You had a good year."



games and four preseason games over the last two NBA seasons. Various reports have said that the point spread moved two points or more in 28 of them. Not enough to be convincing. It's the free-throw differentials that stand out.

The January 2, 2006, Phoenix-Knicks game in New York. Knicks had 54 free throws, Phoenix 16. November 19, 2005, Memphis at Utah. Memphis had 30 free throws, 11 for Utah. The December 18, 2006, Washington at Denver game. Denver shot 44 free throws, Washington 18.

And so on. But any decent lawyer could dredge up games that point in the opposite direction. So the feds must have something more. 

"This is the liturgical service," said the usher as we stood in the entrance of the sanctuary, gazing over the scattering of congregants under the high, white ceiling. "Over in the gym is the contemporary service, which is quite well attended. They have more songs over there." Different songs, too. In the sanctuary, two female voices rang out clean, twining harmonies from the choirloft: "Joyful, joyful, we adore thee/ God of heaven, Lord of love/ Hearts unfold like flowers before thee/ Opening to the sun above...' In the dim (and wellpeopled) cinder-block gym, two female voices sang from the stage, hitting minor intervals in the prelude to "We Will Worship": "Whoooaaaa...we will worship the Lamb of glory...with our hands lifted high to the sky/ When the world wonders why/ We'll just tell

them we're loving our King." The usher was right about the abundance of songs at the contemporary service: three during the gathering, one in preparation for the Scripture readings, one after the sermon, three more during communion, and a closer. Still, it wasn't exactly liturgy lite. The liturgical service included a Kyrie, a Gloria, and a Collect, but it shared the Creed, the Our Father, and the Confession of Sin with the contemporary service. And the contemporary offered the Sign of Peace and the Lord's Supper to boot, the latter made unusual by the congregation's (as opposed to the presider's) recitation of the Words of Institution: This is my body... This cup is the new covenant in my blood."

The Communion song began, "Come, just as you are/ Come and see, come receive/ Come and live forever." But the program noted, "Preparation for communion is a Scriptural imperative," and referred us to text that included the following: "We believe that Christ has instituted this sacrament...but for the comfort and strengthening of baptized Christians who repent of their sins, [and] believe in Him.... Your participation in this sacrament is an act of your agreement with the teaching of the Lutheran Church." Later, I asked Burkey about that teaching. "When Jesus said, 'This is my blood,' we think He was speaking specifically. Not that the bread and wine actually, physically, becomes the body, but in a spiritual, supernatural...the phrase we use is 'Real Presence.' It's there when the people hear the words of institution spoken and then eat the bread and drink the wine.

But that was at the end. The beginning was the commissioning of youth for the National Youth Gathering in Florida. "You have been chosen by God and Christ before the creation of the world," said Pastor Burkey to the young souls gathered before him, "and now you are about to set off on a great adventure...to celebrate your identity as a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God."

The Gospel — or, as the program had it, "The Message from God's Life-Building Word" -

touched on the service's theme: "Building a Life that Matters: Attitude Matters." It told of Christ's dining in a Pharisee's

house. First, He healed a man on the Sabbath, asking, "If one of you has a son or an ox that falls into a well on the Sabbath day, will you not immediately pull him out?" Then, He counseled against seeking places of honor. "For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." And finally, he admonished his host to give banquets for those who could not repay him: "the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind...You will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous.'

Before the sermon, a three-person drama in which a man called out mock-friendly churchfolk: "You wanted nothing of me when I wasn't attractive, and now that I am attractive, I don't want anything to do with you." The churchfolk

didn't get it: "He seemed to be coming along so

During the sermon, Burkey told us that 'when Jesus tells a story...it describes who God is, and what our life could be in the Kingdom of God... God is the host... He gives us tremendous gifts: forgiveness, life with God, meaning, purpose... He even invites us to a special meal... the body and blood of Jesus, Jesus made one with us. There is no way in the world we can ever repay that. But what we can do is express His love to other people... As we travel down the ladder of service, we discover that Jesus travels with us. And as we reach out to other people, we discover that Jesus is in them, and even more, they discover that Jesus is in us."

What happens when we die?

"We believe that those who have faith in Christ have the certainty of eternal life with Him," said Burkey. "And that those who have rejected Him get what they desire: life without God."



was up in Carlsbad and stopped into a thrift store," chirped my friend Bernice, "and do you know what I found there? A Barracuda pool cleaner for \$40! In perfect working order! Fitzgerald was right: the rich are different. One for your column, no?"

That was five years ago. Bernice, who's even better at saving money than I am, was happy because she had just bought a house. A total fixer, but a real diamond in the rough — it even had a pool. The water was green, and the plaster was etched from multiple acid washes, but still... And now she had an automatic pool cleaner to help with the restoration and maintenance.

But five years was all the life the old Barracuda had left in it, and after it broke, it didn't take long for visitors to notice the water looking a little cloudier than in years past. Bernice has always been generous with her pool, so a bunch of us decided to chip in for a new cleaner by way of saying thanks.

For guidance, I called Keith Zimmerman, the owner of Reliable Pool Service (619-384-4789), which services East County. He was glad we were replacing the cleaner. "If you don't have a pool vacuum, your pool is going to look like hell in five years, especially if it's white plaster. Even if someone's cleaning it weekly, it still gets dirty all week long, and the dirt gets into the pores of the plaster. You need to protect your investment."

For starters, Zimmerman laid out a pool's general workings. "A pump sucks the water through the skimmer — that catches the big particles and objects. From the skimmer, the water is forced through a filter and then cycled back into the pool. Most pumps run four hours a day in the winter and six in the summer; it generally takes six hours for your pump to run all the pool's water through the filter."

Filters come in three basic styles: "In San Diego, the most popular one is the DE, or diatomaceous earth. It has eight vertical grids attached to a manifold. You put diatomaceous earth — which is crushed-

up seashells in a whitepowder form — onto the grid; it forms a coating that will filter the water down to four microns. Then you have the cartridge filter, which has a paper element. It's not quite as efficient as the DE. Third, you have the sand filter

it's a tank full of sand, and the sand actually does the filtering. They work well, but they're labor-intensive when you have to change out the sand. Out of 100 pools that I care for, I've got only one sand filter."

But no filter can take care of things like pH and kids with excitable bladders, so you need regular chemical treatments as well. Zimmerman explained: "Each person swimming in a pool is continuously sweating into that pool — Olympic swimmers sweat between one to one-and-a-half pints of fluid an hour. You need a sanitizer to kill off any organisms,

because a pool is a closed body of water." (Hence the green water when Bernice first moved in.) "Chlorine does that. It oxidizes all the contaminants."

As for pH, "you want to keep the water neutral, 7.4 to 7.6. Water is corrosive to begin with, but if it drops below 7.4, it becomes acidic and starts eating anything it touches, things like pool plaster and swimsuits. It can even be hard on your eyes. To correct that, you add sodium bicarbonate — baking soda — to raise the pH. On the other hand, if the pH gets over 7.8, it starts to scale — you get a white calcium buildup. To fight that, you add acid."

Finally, there is the matter of the stuff that sinks to the bottom or sticks to the walls. That's where your automatic pool cleaner comes in. "There are two different types — the pressure side, which works off the return line, and the suction side, which works off the skimmer. The cleaners have a head and sectioned

hose lines. I like only three brands: the Hayward Navigator, the

Pentair Kreepy-Krauly, and the Zodiac Barracuda. They all retail between \$300 and \$400 (discounts available from Reliable Pool Service), and you can expect to get five to ten years out of them.

"The Naviga-

"The Navigator," said Zimmerman, "looks like a small rectangular box with a hose attached to it. It has two

rocker arms on each side that rock back and forth and up and down. There are rubber-type shoes on the bottom. It's programmed to clean the whole pool — two minutes to the right, two minutes to the left, and so on for the entire length of the pool. The Kreepy and the Barracuda are random cleaners; they won't get every square inch of the pool. They've got winged rubber bottoms that agitate the dirt so that it can be sucked up. They also pulsate, so the pool water moves. Sometimes, customers say they can hear the pulsating, but the Navigator is silent. It's also the number one performer for a pool with steps — it won't get hung up on them. The downside is that you have to change out the rocker arms and shoes every two years — they wear out. It costs

about \$60. The other two have fewer moving parts," so the maintenance is cheaper, but you do have that danger of getting stuck on the steps, especially if the bottom step is at a really sharp angle. "Also, because the Barracuda has a diaphragm, something the size of an acorn can get stuck

in it. Then you have to unscrew it and remove the object — but it's not a big deal. Still, if I had a pool that got a lot of leaf droppage, I wouldn't get a Barracuda."

As for maintenance, Zimmerman warned me to never coil the hose. "It will get a memory, and stay kinked permanently. If you want to take the hose out, pull the sections apart and stack them, or lay the hose out full-length."





Enter the Optigan

"The Optigan was a kind of home organ made by the Optigan Corporation, a subsidiary of Mattel, in the early '70s," says Pea Hicks of the obscure instrument around which his band Optiganally Yours revolves. "It was set up like

most home organs of the period, [with] a small keyboard with buttons on the left for various chords, accompaniments, and rhythms. At the time, all organs produced their sounds electrically or electronically with tubes or transistors. The Optigan

was different in that its sounds were read off of LP-sized celluloid discs, which contained the graphic waveforms of real instruments...similar to the soundtrack on a film reel.

"Playing back recorded instruments was a pretty unique concept for the early '70s," says Hicks. "Technically speaking, the Optigan was a primitive sampler. Sort of. I tend to think of it more like a poor man's Mellotron.... They sold mostly through stores like Sears and JCPenny and were relatively inexpensive, about \$200 to \$400." Working models now sell for \$2000 and up. Several unreleased Optiganally Yours songs are playable at mp3it.com.





Local blogger Rosey Bystrak posts video at sddialedin.com from an unannounced KPRI private listener concert held in early May on a Hornblower cruise, featuring Tim Finn (Split Enz, Crowded House). "I got a text from my friend," she blogs, "telling me that he heard that Neil Finn and Eddie Vedder might be joining Tim. How could I skip that, even if there was less than a 1% chance that it was true?" Though Vedder and the other brother Finn were no-shows, she says the private show was still "beyond worthwhile."

Her posted video shows Finn performing Split Enz's "I Got You." There's also a photo of his actual setlist, autographed and with duct tape along the top and bottom. "That setlist is not completely accurate," says Bystrak, "because Tim threw in a couple requests, including 'Six Months in a Leaky Boat,' to stay with a nautical theme."





Among the bands in the "Rabble community" are the Offspring, the Aquabats, Sleater-Kinney, the Shins, Fight Paris, and Rogue Wave. "The really unique thing Rabble offers," says Oien, "is the ability to message their favorite musician on their mobile phone [through Rabble's service]." (www.rabble.com)

DRM-Free Music Downloads

Launched in May, localbased mTraks.com offers individual songs and music subscriptions, promising files that are free of DRM (digital rights management) limitations. Downloads will play on iPods, compatible MP3 players, computers, and cell phones. Bands can set up free webpages with bios, photos, song links and, said to be coming soon, video. "Our website is the culmination of two years of programming and design," says mTraks founder Dey Martin. "Our site is easier to use for social networking than MySpace, and we believe that we offer a better consumer solution to that of emusic.com."

The site claims to offer around 750,000 songs, featuring more than 80,000 artists. "We were able to make a deal with a major music distributor," says Martin, declining to name the distributor ("That's a trade secret"). Monthly fees begin at \$9.99 for up to 30 downloads at 27 cents each, while by-the-song purchases run 99 cents to \$1.29, depending on file quality. Locally connected performers so far represented on the site include Rob Crow, Pinback, Opti-

LEMON GROVE INCIDENT (Part Two)

On January 5, 1931, when Jerome T. Greene stood on the front steps of Lemon Grove Grammar School (LGGS) waiting for the first bell, he must have felt like Judas.

School principal for less than a year, Greene was a man of mystery.

People wondered why by the PhD scholar, who Jeff wore double-breasted Smith suits and spoke with a British accent, would teach at such a rural hamlet. And he must have wondered why, on the first Monday after Christmas break, he'd been chosen to rip the school, and the community, apart.

The cast-iron bell blared through crisp morning air. Greene gathered students around him. There's been a change, he announced: all Mexican children will be going to the new school on Olive Street. Your books and desks are already there. Now move aside and let the other pupils go to class.

At the urging of the PTA and

Chamber of Commerce, the school board called an emergency session for August 13, 1930. Blaming "overcrowding of pupils, sanitary and moral conditions" on Latino students, the board voted for a segregated school in the barrio just six blocks from the original. As the two-room, wooden structure took shape, the community named it La Caballeriza ("the barnyard"). When rumors spread it might be for Latinos only, the families bonded to fight the move.

The board ordered Greene not to tell the students. He disobeyed and encouraged 12-year-old Roberto Alvarez to circulate a piece of paper. Those Latinos who would attend La Caballeriza should sign their names. Before Alvarez could begin, his uncle Richard Castellanos — "a tough, proud guy who liked to pick fights," recalls Roberto's son, Robert Alvarez, Jr. — tore it up.

The board assumed "docile" Latinos would accept the change. But rather than follow Greene up Olive Street that January morning, all but three went home. Their parents had decided to strike — and they won the


first school desegregation case in United States history.

"75 MEXICAN STUDENTS GO ON STRIKE," the *San Diego Evening Tribune* announced on January 8. The next day, the *San Diego Sun* claimed, "PUPILS BACK AT DESKS IN LEMON GROVE."

"The matter was amicably settled," said L. H. Lovelace, county truancy officer. Along with superintendent Ada York and board member H. L. Owens, Lovelace assumed the 75 would attend the new school after all. Most of the students had separate "Americanization" classes at LGGS that taught English and other subjects for immigrants. Olive Street wasn't a segregated school, Lovelace said, just an enlarged Americanization program.

When the board met on January 14, however, members had to suspend all "accumulated business" until February. Latino students still refused to attend school #2. And their parents sought legal aid.

Calling themselves *El Comitée de Vecinos de Lemon Grove* ("The Lemon Grove Neighborhood Committee"), the parents contacted Enrique Ferreira, Mexican Vice Consul in San Diego for 10 years. Though he told the *San Diego Sun* that "American laws don't uphold the separation of Mexican children in public schools," Fer-

reira warned the committee that Mexico had a "hands off" policy; he couldn't interfere with U.S. affairs. Instead, he sent them to lawyers Fred C. Noon, an expert on border relations who spoke fluent Spanish, and A.C. Brinkley.

On January 25, the committee made a national appeal in *La Opinion*, California's largest Spanish-speaking newspaper: "We do not consider it just to send our children to an establishment that distinguishes Mexican children from children of other nationalities." The letter concluded with a plea for moral and material support and generated enough money to cover all court costs

"Our Mexicans were never like

this," the San Diego Sun quoted an unnamed person, "it must be those Mexicans from Los Angeles or the ones coming from Mexico. They are corrupting our Mexicans."

Andy Anderson, school board president, told the press he had no idea the Latino community was so unified. He suspected that an "intense national organization" must be backing the strike.

This wasn't true. Many families had come up from Baja together some decades earlier. They shared a culture and hardships in common (in 1938 they formed the Workers and Agricultural Union, went on strike again, and raised wages for local lemon pickers).

The board faced a second problem. Schools were funded on "average daily attendance." Donald Heyser: "With some 40 percent or more of the pupils not attending school, the loss had to be a cause for concern."

In late January and early February, the county threatened to expel students absent for 20 days or more. Rumors circulated that Latinos working for the county would lose jobs if their children stayed home (rumors also claimed that Latinos were boycotting Andy Anderson's gas station on Imperial Avenue).

L.H. Lovelace, the truancy officer, went door to door accusing Latinos of breaking the law.

"You're breaking the law by not letting our children go to a real school," David Ruiz remembers his mother, Guadalupe, shouting at Lovelace, unimpressed by his badge.

A recent widow and mother of seven, Guadalupe said, "Admit my children to the regular school and I'll be happy to send them."

Her late husband

had worked for the county, and she received public assistance after he died. Keep your kids out of school, Lovelace threatened, and payments stop. Within days

of this exchange, U.S. Immigration deported the entire Ruiz family to Tijuana — even though all were U.S. citizens.

"Five brothers were born here," said David Ruiz. "We spent most of our kid-lives here, and then they throw us to another country that we didn't know. We didn't know where to belong." On February 13, the

and "entitled to the rights and privileges of citizens of the Caucasian race."

The committee filed the petition in Department 4 of the Superior Court, case #66625. Roberto Alvarez, the fifth-grader Greene asked to circulate the questionnaire, had been chosen to represent the segregated children. He was a model student who spoke perfect English.

On February 21, the board denied all allegations. The new school wasn't segregated. It was an Americanization program "wherein backward and deficient children could be given better instruction."

The committee replied with a demurrer: the board didn't have the power to segregate pupils of Mexican parentage in a separate school.

The board *does* have that power, the trustees shot back. The lawsuit will prove it.

Roberto Alvarez v. the Board of Trustees of the Lemon Grove School District went to trial at San Diego Superior Court on February 24, 1931 — Claude Chambers, presiding judge. Philip Smith, attorney for the defense, contended that most Latino children were "behind and inferior" to Anglos. The Americanization program would teach English and "the ways of the U.S.A." And since the school was built in the "northernly" part of town, children wouldn't have to cross dangerous Imperial Avenue or the railroad tracks.

Olive Street School was never meant to be segregated, Smith concluded. When students improve their skills, they can return to the "mainstream" school.

Fred C. Noon, the prosecuting attorney, argued against Latino students' alleged "backwardness." He brought Roberto Alvarez to the stand.

"Do you feel you learn at a slower pace than white children?"

"No," replied Alvarez, now enrolled at Sherman Elementary School, "I feel like we all learn the same. I know English fine. I can read it, write it, and speak it fluently with my friends."

Noon had nine other students demonstrate English skills. One of them, Carlos Smith, only spoke English. When Noon asked a question in Spanish, Smith needed it translated.

Not all Latino students lived near school #2, Noon argued. And some Anglo students did. Therefore both sides were at risk crossing Imperial Avenue. Plus, Americanization pupils would have

outdated books and underqualified teachers. Therefore, Olive Street was separate and unequal.

During the interrogatory, Judge Chambers asked Florine Markland, a first-year teacher at #2, "When American children are behind, what do you do with them?"

Markland: "They are kept in a lower grade."

Chambers: "You don't segregate them? Why not do the same with the other children? Wouldn't the association of American and Mexican children be favorable to the learning of English for these children?"

Markland had no reply.

Judge Chambers delivered his verdict on March 11, 1931. School #2 is segregated, he said, which violates California law

Chambers ruled on a technicality. State law in 1931 condoned segregation of Asian-, African-,

and Native Americans, but not Latinos. In 1848, to allow Californios to become naturalized U.S. citizens, the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo defined Mexican Americans as Caucasians. Since students at Olive Street School were Caucasian, the trustees were wrong to separate them. Chambers demanded immediate reinstatement of all Latino children to Lemon Grove Grammar School "on a basis of equality with all other children of [the] school district."

"It was a real victory for the community," says Robert Alvarez, Jr. (whose father, the plaintiff, founded Coast Citrus, one of the major wholesalers of fruits and vegetables in the U.S. and Mexico). "They knew their rights and stood up for them. But after they won, they didn't brag about it."



(continued from page 40) Diego, Alvarez hadn't heard the story until he researched it decades after the fact. "People in my generation are proud it happened, but my grandparents just went on with their lives and never brought it up -

and they were involved."

Before it disappeared, the case may have influenced thinking about the Bliss Bill. On January, 19, 1931, California Assemblyman George Bliss introduced a bill that would reclassify Latinos as Indians, not Caucasians, thus legalizing segregation of Mexican American students. Possibly with an eye toward Lemon Grove, the state legislature defeated the Bliss Bill by a fairly wide margin.

The case also disappeared because the school board — stuck with court costs and loss



of daily attendance funding and wanting to avoid more negative publicity — refused to appeal. Minutes for the March 12 meeting proclaim, "On account of having lost the court decision, there was some discussion about the return of Mexican pupils, but only a spirit of goodwill prevailed, and it was decided that everything was to continue exactly as it did prior to Jan. 5th."

A few months later, the board took one last potshot: they fired principal Jerome T. Greene.



Sitting in the Learning Resource Center at San Diego City College. I am among at least 100 empty chairs, many of them comfortable enough to sleep in, though I hesitate to say so. I've done it of course. I have been left undisturbed for as long as an hour and a half.

"Learning Resource Center" is one of those increasingly common euphemisms I consider a form of computer-age illiteracy, a techno-bastard of the word "library." But a library it is, and a very good one, a quiet (despite its location off down-

town on Park Boulevard, off C Street), well-lighted place. At the moment I am sitting on the top level of three floors (the building is on a low hill), looking out a south-facing bank of floor-to-ceiling windows.

I can see the Coronado Bridge, the clock tower at the Twelfth and Imperial trolley station, high-rise condos that look like giant, twin disposable cigarette lighters, and the Hyatt, which I think of as the Cheese Grater Building, to my immediate right. Just below me and across the small parking lot is the Soon Lee Chinese

laundry. To the left is City Boxing, where young women learn the art of Thai kickboxing. The Honeybee Café next door provides coffee, evening entertainment, and surprisingly good food. The adjacent bar is a dark and classic collegiate watering hole and showcase for local rock and folk perpetrators. Only blocks away, we have Petco Park, the epicenter of a real-estate storm of eminent domain and a corporate coliseum for a mediocre baseball team: the object of passion, pathos, or apathy to fair-weather fans in a fair-weather city. San Diego High School is roughly

100 yards behind where I sit jotting notes.

It is 9:10 a.m. and I have been here since the center's opening at 8:00.

From where I sit, the closest shelf holds books on insects, birds, shells and other sealife. To my left are medical books, nursing mostly, and across from them, books on the paper and rubber industries, things like *Paper: The Fifth Wonder* and *The House of Goodyear*.

I have just spent an hour downstairs at the computer bank. (Though not a registered student, I'm told it's okay as long as I'm willing to surrender my seat to a

bona fide pupil if necessary — this has never happened.) I downloaded some articles on the Reading Room of the British Museum, I had been there in 1971 and reveled in the proximity to Dickens ("His days there were the most useful he had ever passed"), H.G. Wells, George Bernard Shaw, Darwin, Karl Marx, Kipling, and Hardy. Also, my favorite and stillliving autodidact, Colin Wilson, author of *The Outsider*, The Philosopher's Stone, and The History of Murder.

In his novel The Longest Journey E.M. Forster once wrote (and he may well have written it beneath that famous blue-and-gold bowled ceiling): "In that book encircled space, he always could find peace. He loved to see the volumes rising tier above tier into the misty dome....There he knew that his life was not ignoble."

Here, at the Learning Resource Center, I may doubt the nobility of my life, but I am, for the moment at least, reassured that it is not deafening.

Yesterday, I asked a woman at the information desk what was the most interesting question she had ever been asked. "Not interesting," she said. "Course work." It took a moment to register.

"Any odd questions?" I asked.

"Oh, sometimes crazy

stuff. Aztec civilization, Mayan civilization..." I decided against pointing out that these subjects might fall within the parameters of a consensual definition of sanity, and went instead to the bathroom, where I made a note about the lack of adequate ventilation. I tested the acoustics.

"Superior acoustics in john at LRC/SDCC," I jotted. I began to sing "Born Free." As free as the wind blows...dah da dah da duh dah...'cause vou're born freeee. Additional note: "Bring tape recorder tomorrow. Perfect echo. Tape a cappella 'Daddy's Home' by Shep and The Limelighters."

A student (I'm assum-

ing) with a shaved head and a studded nostril and lip opened the stall door. I looked up and said, "Hey! I'm in here." He stood there for almost ten seconds; maybe English was not his first language. He had on surfer shorts, old OPs or something. They hung not quite below his crotch. I waved my notebook and a copy of Mathew Arnold's Essays in Criticism at him, open to a page on Milton and Shakespeare: "Shakespeare is divinely strong, rich and attractive. But sureness of perfect style Shakespeare himself does possess....Milton, from one

end of Paradise Lost to

another, is in his diction and

rhythm constantly a great artist in the great style."

I pointed with my Pentel at my notebook and said, "I'm working. You mind?"

"Sorry." He turned away. His shorts, below a six-inch ass-crack, bore the logo in Gothic/Old English: "LOST."

The following hour was spent in peace and pleasure. I dozed with impunity. On the right arm of my comfortable chair a small tray on a swinging hinge fit my laptop nicely, but for my nap I stacked the tray with what I hoped would look like exhaustive research on Agriculture. Principles of Field Crop Production (third edition); Plant Propagation: Principles and Practices (also

third edition); *Rice and Man:* Agricultural Ecology in Southeast Asia by Lucien M. Hanks.

Stuffed in my back pocket was the novel I was reading: Adios Scheherazade: The Secret Life of a Sensuous Man by Donald E. Westlake. It is the fictional biography of a pornographer with writer's block. I bought it, along with two other paperbacks, for a dollar over the weekend at the downtown Central Library sale.

The Central Library, or Downtown Branch, is an easy walk from SDCC and should not even be considered exercise. It is my primary learning resource cen-

me, and I kill a little time with Men's Fitness. Mark Wahlberg mocks me with his abs and that look that says: "Hey, Pacemaker Dude. Drop and give me 50." "Writing about the library again?" he asks.





downtown, like you. People have been great to me for years. Someone is bound to misread this and think I'm suggesting it's your fault, or the librarian's fault, that people are cleaning their entire bodies in the bathroom or that there might be more people at this branch with mental disorders acting out in strange ways than at other branches. 

of interesting questions she's been asked. Catherine is in Literature now; she'd been in History for a long time before that and has helped me for over ten years. I did not expect to get inside inside stuff, because being a librarian at this branch has got to have its similarities with being a cop in a wild precinct. Certain stories and jokes are never going to get out of the building. Catherine conducts tours of the library, including its basement, and several years ago she took me on a private one. The basement of the Central Library proved to be even dustier, more gothic, dramatically ill lit, and darkly romantic than even the images with which my childhood, pulp-infused imagination might have dreamed

Catherine handed me some notes she had typed regarding interesting queries. My favorite: "I regularly receive queries from a man in the California state prisons who prefaces his questions with: 'I am a resident of San Diego when not falsely

imprisoned."

Others include:

"If the Virgin Mary was about 15, why wasn't God charged with statutory rape?"

"When Wild Bill Hickock was killed while playing poker, he was holding two pairs, aces and eights, now known as the 'dead man's hand.' What was the fifth card? (This is unanswerable, unless an eyewitness account surfaces.)"

On another sheet she had typed: "Last week a patron from Temecula wanted to verify the authority of a quote attributed to Winston Churchill. Neither Literature nor SERRA could verify it as Churchill's; it was found to be by a somewhat obscure Victorian writer.

"The patron is an artist who has been commissioned to sandblast 35 quotations into a stone wall erected at a new MTS trolley stop. Of her 35 listed quotations, we could only verify three; most of the quotations had been taken from the Internet.

"She was disturbed and anxious about the provenance of the other quota-

tions, and in light of the recent similar public-art problem at the Livermore Library [11 out of 175 names were misspelled on a mosaic was concerned as to how to handle the situation. The commissioning board would have to be told (they had already approved the quotations). Yes. A 35-part stone monument to the Internet's due diligence. This might have given rise to expressions like: "This information is all netted up." Or: "I swear on the information highway!"



Catherine, as on occa-

sion she relates to visitors on her tour, spoke to me about her sympathy for an increasingly large number of people — especially at the Central Branch — who frequent the library, enjoy reading, and cannot be issued library cards because of a lack of a home address. She describes a common scenario where a visitor and would-be-patron spends much of the day at the library and begins reading a book. At closing, or whenever they do leave, the book cannot go with them, and they do not wish to leave it where they found it only to return the next day and find it checked out. Often the book in question is placed in a thoroughly unrelated section of the facility. "It's why we find, say, erotic novels in the automotive section."

And while the Central Branch understandably would rather say it isn't so, no one flatly denied that, on occasion, a library lover or two with no residential address has found him- or herself locked in the building at closing time, pleased to spend the night among the restful stacks.

When I first moved to San Diego, a kind of trial move in October 1977, the year my son was born and my wife had had it with living in Brooklyn (a place I thought thoroughly American and suited to the Chicagoan in me very well, thank you), we came to Coronado. This was such a surreal transplant, I spent four months looking for bartender/ waiter/bookstore work in a disassociative haze aided by coastal fog, alcohol, and the local library on Orange Avenue. The library was my base camp as I eventually only pretended to look for work, instead catching up on the sleep our two- to fivemonth-old son deprived us of. The patent failure to support my new family could only be ameliorated by

and brutal whiskey) and the library, which was a vastly different room 30 years ago.

With its picture windows looking onto Orange and A avenues, and the parklike acre or so flanking its wings, during those late months of 1997 and January of '78, the Coronado library was a vessel that carried me to England as I read the autobiography of Colin Wilson, (Voyage to a Beginning). I fed my hunger for both fiction and nonfiction about the British empire in the 19th Century by dipping into the at-that-time fashionable diaries of officers' wives posted to "Providenceforsaken colonies" and the James Ogilvie novels by Duncan MacNeil. I was on a mission to write a novel, an idea born in an imaginative fever I'd had 15 years earlier in a library in which Hemingway might have done his homework; this was two thousand miles to the east, on the border of Oak Park and River Forest, Illinois. More on that place to follow.

I did find work at the service bar of the Hotel Del,



sweating in a polyester red vest/jacket and bow tie, concealed from guests in a glass booth stocked with liquor, sweating out the coffee and Irish whiskey I consumed and learning Spanish from the room-service waiters. I also found part-time work as a bartender in the Fiesta Room, a cocktail lounge off La Avenida, a restaurant no longer there — at least in that family-dining incarnation. The Fiesta Room was, for me, a nightmare of nearcomatose alcoholic Republican golfers, who never seemed to actually golf and who kept trying to speak to me in horrific Spanish, far worse than my own at the time. A sadistic moron named Tarazzi or Terrizzi or something like that, who eventually fired me, managed the bar. The reason I mention the job is that a striking mural in La Avenida was the backdrop to this four-month nightmare. The mural is first-class work of its kind, salvaged after a devastating fire totaled that Coronado landmark-of-arestaurant, and now greets you as you enter the renovated library on that island I once described in a novel as "a town full of retired admirals living with their

The mural was painted by Alfred Ramos Martinez in 1938 and titled *El Dia del Mercado*. Gus and Barbara Theberge donated it to the City of Coronado in 1994. In the literature on that painting that I picked up at the front desk of the library, I read that Chiang Kai-shek once recruited aviators for the Flying Tigers on the sidewalk outside the restaurant.

parents."

Once inside the new library, the passage of 30 years was in abundant and bittersweet evidence. To the right as you enter is a display case full of neato, boffo souvenirs from WWI. Here is a Haenel rifle, some German helmets, swords, trench shovels, gas masks, and one Kaiser-type Pickelhaube helmet you would not want to sit on. Also, what looks to be a first English edition of *All Quiet on the Western Front*.

The renovation, opened to the public in June 2005, is sleekly impressive, and, with regret, I am tempted to add, sterile. Though it is undoubtedly a much better

library now, it has little of the suburban modesty that characterized the place for years previously. Wide-screen computer monitors have replaced the temperamental old ones. The staff (many of the same faces) are as smart, courteous, and helpful as ever. The place now puts me in mind of, say, the Love Library at SDSU, a kind of set for a science-fiction film about a vast digital police station where books are secondary to the specious data highway we have all embarked upon.

I had meant to include in my roundup "The Library of Love," as I came to think of it, ironically — that cool

and perfect place — and to suggest the number of "keggers," for example, that could be held simultaneously in the facility. I could think of little else to say about it, being no architectural aficionado nor megabyte maven or maniac. I also considered including the Horticultural Library in Balboa Park, with its peaceable ambiance, its next-door senior lounge, one of the great reading spots downtown, comparable, in its shabby-chic way to the Wagenheim Room at the Central Library (which I've written of elsewhere). But none of these places have moved me or marked me in the way the four

libraries I've chosen to write about here have.

The very first library I fell in love with, as a second home, was the Oak Park/ River Forest Library in suburban Chicago. During a return to Chicago in 1991 at the age of 40, I borrowed my brother's 1963 Triumph Bonneville and rode, sans helmet and with only goggles, from the city to that northwest suburb of Oak Park, where Ernest Hemingway once lived, and then to its western edge, where it borders River Forest (the fifth largest suburb in the world - at one time, any-

way) and where I used to live as a kid, delivering newspapers to the foreboding mansion of gangster Tony Accardo, one of the last of the original Al Capone mob.

That motorcycle daytrip in 1990 is a memory of as nearly a perfect day as God rations out. Springtime in a Midwestern city: the air sharp, keeping one focused and attentive, coupled with crosswinds bearing warmth and a floral yet human scent, like the breath of an infant, or perhaps that one woman you once knew all too briefly. At the edge of the park, between Hemingway's play-grounds and Accardo's dark fortress, sat the library, a brick and ivy-covered cottage, far smaller than the one provided by memory.

Among the most pleasant memories of childhood are those of sitting in one of two facing red leather chairs that seemed to envelope me. These flanked a great fireplace, often in use during winter months. I would sit for good periods of time with volumes of *New Yorker* cartoons of which *The*

Addams Family series by Charles Addams were favorites. I eventually checked out all the Hardy Boys books they kept downstairs in the children's library and was, I suppose, unaware that one could always ask for others. I supplied myself with sev-

eral dozen volumes at two dollars each from Sears, Roebuck, a decent bicycle trek to Irving Park Plaza (an early shopping center in the Paleozoic era). This triggers another memory of negotiating an armload consisting of *The Great Airport Mys*

tery, The Tower Treasure, The Twisted Claw, and a few others by Franklin W. Dixon, while riding my J.C. Higgins through a gathering tornado down suburban streets against headwinds so strong, they upended the front wheel of my bike, and I managed the longest wheelie ever for a personal

In those capacious, wine-colored chairs, I read young-adult books about for some reason I suspect having to do with my mother having taken me to see The Inn of the Sixth Happiness, then reading the book — China. Once I hit Pearl S. Buck and The Good Earth, the librarian suspected it was time for me to graduate upstairs and get an adult card. My interest in China faded, as very little of the stuff I knew how to find rivaled the beheading scene in the Deborah Kerr film. I must have been 10 or 11 when I discovered science fiction, but that was not in the River Forest/Oak Park library. I literally picked it up on the streets.


My younger brother and I, having just moved from Chicago's West Side, full of Italian and Polish immigrants and near a pocket of "hillbillies" from Appalachia, were astonished at what suburban residents considered trash and so put out on the curb. We would go "garbage picking" and bring home embarrassing odds and ends of refuse. One genuine treasure I still maintain might have been highly collectible, gone now with priceless baseball cards and bottle caps, was a carton of leatherette-bound hardcover books from a British publisher and dated from the 1920s. Among these (along with - to me - expendable Brontë and Austen and inscrutable Shakespeare volumes) were Jules Verne's Twenty Thousand Leagues under the Sea, Journey to the Centre of the Earth, and Around the World in Eighty Days. I also hauled H.G. Wells's scientific romances, Rafael Sabatini's Captain Blood, and a few other swashbucklers, including Scaramouche, which has one of

the best opening lines ever written: "He was born with a gift of laughter and a sense that the world was mad." (The line is carved over one of the entrances to Yale University and is to this day visible.) Here, also, were P.C Wren's novel Beau Geste and The Four Feathers by A.E.W. Mason, Bram Stoker's Dracula, and the ultimate treasure, Frankenstein, I read Frankenstein first, and 20 years later, read in Brian Aldiss's Billion Year Spree that he considered that book to qualify as the very first science fiction novel - in the contemporary sense. So I boarded that wonky bus to nerd-dom at the beginning of the line.

Back at the library, I picked up A Century of Science Fiction edited by, I think, Damon Knight.

In all, I probably spent a good part of my preadolescence (or pre-rock-androll years) in that library, where I also discovered Junky by William S. Burroughs (and I wonder how that got in there in the early 1960s, or if I imported it myself

from a drugstore rack) and I Was a Teenage Drug Addict by someone or other. Neither of these books had what I suppose was the desired effect on a kid, warning me of horrors along that road, but instead whetted a morbid curiosity, a dark romanticism defeated in later years only by the underdocumented boredom of drug abuse. My alternate libraries were suburban rooftops, primarily that of our family's garage, where my parents' fights were muffled and carried only sporadically by gusts of wind and the slamming of doors. One experience, hardly wholesome and fit for a Reader's Digest memoir, was nonetheless a pleasant and perversely sentimental snapshot from 1965. A friend's older brother had sent him opium from Vietnam. My brother and I smoked it on the rooftop of my grandmother's home in Berkeley, Illinois, as I read The Time Machine aloud and we gorged ourselves on fresh cherries, within easy reach from a neighbor's tree. It was during that

period that I first fantasized about being a writer, incorporating the idea that I might be issued a pipe and a .45 caliber pistol as Mickey Spillane was depicted on some paperback cover. It was a further dream that I might return to River Forest one day from Africa or the Antarctic to find my own adventure novels on the shelves of that local library. This was a dream that materialized that day in 1991 when I found my first published book in hardcover on the fiction shelf there. I also found red leatherette chairs to either side of the shrunken fireplace that could not have been the same chairs at all; over the years, they too had grown impossibly small. When I left the library that spring afternoon and straddled my brother's Triumph, I wore a smile that remained locked in place — by wind, centrifugal force, and destiny itself, by God — all the way back through city streets and the northern lake country and into the night. ■

1931 school desegregation case in your July 12 issue ("The Lemon Grove Incident"). We eagerly await part 2 of the story next week.

This case -- the first successful court-ordered school desegregation case in the United States, predating Brown v. Board of Education by 23 years --

should be examined by every generation, as should all cases bearing upon freedom and justice in our democratic republic.

Jeff's writing, at once fervent and dispassionate, urgent and focused, brings to life the facts surrounding the fate of some 75 children (almost 100 percent of them U.S. citizens), who were shut out of Lemon Grove's lone grammar school at the onset of the Great Depression.

Economic privation is oft-cited as a key reason for the actions of the school board members, who plotted segregation in the summer of 1930 -- but, at heart, it was old-fashioned racism and unspeakable cruelty toward the children involved.

We in the Lemon Grove Historical Society were delighted to open our archives to assist Jeff with his research earlier this year. We were beyond delighted on March 9 when Roberto Ricardo Alvarez, the 12-year-old hero of the 1931 case, was enshrined as "Roberto Alvarez Auditorium" at Lemon Grove Middle School, replete with a handsome bronze plaque bearing his likeness. Please remember the name of our school superintendent, Dr. Ernie Anastos, who orchestrated the gala celebration of this event, which was attended by a huge, ecstatic audience.

I close by mentioning the late Donald Heyser, historian of the Lemon Grove Historical Society, who wrote with passion and empathy about the case, and Professor Robert Alvarez of





If they were real musicians, they wouldn't be crying because they don't have a fan base and lost some







Slow Death via e-mail

Downside of 40

In almost 20 years of being a fan of the Reader, this is the first time I have felt strongly enough about a story to write a letter. This makes me appreciate the challenges Mr. Darrow must have gone through and I'm sure still does. And how tough he must be, because art, like acting, requires so much of your own soul to be put out to be critiqued. Not counting just the act of painting -- the intense concentration, the physical act of just sitting or standing in one place for hours, how your mind replays what is going on with the canvas even when you are not there in front of

That is why I think anyone who loves, lives with, or even appreciates art needs to read this story, and as a selftaught artist, it sums up some points that took me years of practice and many books to learn.

(Is there any chance Geoff could resell this story to, say, American Artist or International Artist magazine?)

Geoff, thank you for yet another fresh and fair perspective on a subject that this time happens to be near to my heart. And it really is a great likeness, but maybe you should let your mom

live with it for a while -- you will love it all the more when you've put some years behind you and see how well David captured your youth and intensity with mere paint and canvas.



Made in China

re realized that our son, who was four at the time, needed new shoes," says Sara Bongiorni, author of A Year Without "Made in China": One Family's True Life Adventure in the Global Economy. "It's one of several examples of searching for an ordinary item that's not from China. After a weeks-long saga, we ended up getting tennis shoes from Italy. With shipping, it was almost \$70, compared to \$15 for kids' sneakers from Payless or Target." Bongiorni will discuss her book at Book Works in Del Mar on Thursday, July 26.

"We were sitting in our living room at the end of 2004, a debris field of gifts and

LOCAL **EVENTS** toys and wrapping paper all over. I just started looking at the stuff, at our room, and realized most of our stuff

we'd received and given for Christmas was from China," remembers Bongiorni. "I thought it would be interesting to see if we could go a whole year, if it would even be possible, without buying anything with a label that said 'Made in China.'" She decided that her family could keep all the Chinese-made items they already had but would not purchase any new ones.

Bongiorni forgives her husband, who had agreed to a year of forgoing Chinesemade products, for his minor relapses, one of which occurred three months in. "He sold our boycott short for some Chinese paintbrushes. He tried to sneak them in behind my back and got caught redhanded." When the Padres played the Cincinnati Reds in Petco Park, the Welk

family, of the Welk family resorts, was giving away promotional coolers. "Of course, I look at the label on the outside and it says, 'Made in China.' I loved this thing, and we had a gift exemption, but this wasn't really a gift," Bongiorni recalls. While she struggled to make a decision, Bongiorni's husband said, "I don't know what you're doing with yours, but I'm keeping mine."

"There were several showdowns with our son over things like monster trucks and lightswords. Almost all toys are made in China," says Bongiorni. In fact, she adds, "So many ordinary items, like phones, only come from China." Bongiorni's parents, who live in La Mesa, at first thought the boycott was silly. Her mother, who enjoyed mocking the boycott, once gave Bongiorni's son a sleeping bag made in China. "She had taken the box the sleeping bag came in and took a big black marker pen and changed the print outside so that instead of 'Made in China' it read 'Made in Chile.'

Bongiorni learned from an encounter during the first month of her boycott to "keep her mouth shut" about it. "I went into a little shop here in Baton Rouge, and I was admiring Mardi Gras-themed jewelry on a rack on the counter. The owner was real sweet and said, 'Try them on,' and I said, 'I'm sorry, I'm not buying anything from China,' and she said, 'How are those three-

year-olds in China going to survive without support from people like you? How are they going to make their economy stronger?' I had misgivings and second thoughts and self-doubts [throughout the year].

According to the Associated Press, three million manufacturing jobs have been lost in the United States since 2000. In 2006, the U.S. purchased \$288 billion worth of products from China, more than five times the amount China spent on imports from the U.S. It is estimated that 80 percent of toys now sold in America are made in China. Bongiorni found that the second largest exporter to the States is Taiwan. Most of the toys she had purchased were made in Taiwan or Thailand. A lot of clothing came from Peru or Egypt.

"What about 'Made in America'?" Bongiorni asks. "You'd see that label so rarely I'd start to think, 'How is it possible that it's the strongest economy in the world? What drives our economy?"

While writing her book, Bongiorni did an informal investigation of Wal-Mart. Of the first 106 products she came across, 52 were from China, 23 were from the U.S., 4 from Honduras, and the remainder from Italy, Pakistan, and Turkey.

"I ran into a neighbor there, and when he asked me what I was doing, I didn't tell him. It's kind of embarrassing.'







A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND I BY JERRY SCHAD

he James Dilley Greenbelt Preserve, a unit within Orange County's Laguna Coast Wilderness Park, dates back to a landmark purchase by the city of Laguna Beach in 1978. Environmentalist James Dilley helped champion the concept of "greenbelts," or parcels of open space between cityscapes, back in

The trail system in the preserve is pieced together out of former bulldozed roads and current utility roads. The three-mile loop described here covers the best trails and touches upon the best sights the preserve has to offer. The first stretch (Canyon Trail) doubles as a portion of the 1.8-mile long Bea Whittlesly

Loop self-guiding nature trail, which features posts keyed to a brochure available at the trailhead.

Park at the Dilley staging area on the east side of Laguna Canyon Road (Highway 133), 0.2 mile north of the Highway 73 toll road overcrossing. Head east across a field of sage and buckwheat on the Canvon Trail, which at first gains elevation gradually

and stays near the bottom of a small canyon dotted with gorgeous specimens of coast live oak and California sycamore. At about 0.7 mile the trail begins a steeper ascent, curling upward through a patch of prickly-pear cactus (look or

listen for cactus wrens). At 1.0 mile, you arrive on top of a buried water reservoir on a 624-foot knoll. Take a look around. The Leisure World development lies to the east, the open spaces of the Laguna Coast Wilderness Park sprawl to the south and west, and if it's clear enough you can spot the 10.000-foot-high summit of Mount San Antonio floating above the hazy urban landscape in the north.

Next, slip down the slope east of the reservoir to reach a maintained fire road following the ridge top. You'll want to head north not on the gravel road that descends smoothly to the north and east, but rather on the somewhat rougher "Edison" road on the right that stays more or less underneath the high-voltage power lines. That route takes you down to and then right along the shoreline of beautiful Barbara's Lake, the larger of two small lakes that constitute Orange County's only naturally formed inland bodies of water. The lakes are geologically described as small sag ponds, located where the ground has subsided due to movements along a fault. Since Barbara's Lake is shallow and its drainage area is small, it is believed that artesian springs on the lake bottom help keep it full no matter what the

At Barbara's Lake and elsewhere in the Laguna Coast Wilderness Park, you will find large plaques with original plein air paintings

by local artists. Ultravioletresistant coatings on the paintings have kept them from fading much over a number of years.


From the gravel road at the south end of Barbara's Lake, you can make a side trip under Laguna Canyon Road's arched overpasses to reach the brand-new James and Rosemary Nix Nature Center on the far side (open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily; free admission). What are the strange cavities on the undersides of those overpasses? They are entrances into the hollow interiors of the concrete structures for use by bats and swallows.

Exclusive of the side trip under the overpasses, the remainder of our designated three-mile route goes south from the gravel road on nearly a bee-line course back to the Dilley staging area.





What book(s) are you currently reading? What page are you on?

The Nasty Bits: Collected Varietal Cuts, Usable Trim, Scraps, and Bones by Anthony Bourdain. I'm on page 33. Tell us a little about the book.

I love it! He doesn't talk so much about the preparation of food — he talks more about the chef's environment and the people involved in food preparation. It's more interesting than a book about cooking.

What do you make of the plot (or argument if nonfiction)?

It's different from everything [I've read]. It's a collection of magazine articles, and [the style is] down and dirty. He's very enthusiastic but graphic. It's still early, but I hope it keeps going.

What about the style — language easy to understand? Is it well-written/researched/plotted? What are your favorite passages?

In the foreword, Bourdain describes going sealhunting with the Inuit. The description of the seal being prepared is what we'd consider grisly, but it's a great contrast. They are truly

savoring the food...and the people coming together for a meal.

The foreword is my favorite passage so far.

Compare this book with others you have read.

The style is very different from most books in this category. I've read some of the food books in the *Like Water for Chocolate*-style, but I like this better. I like the grittiness of it and the author's enthusiasm. It isn't pretty — that's what I like about it. Tell us what book or other work has been the most life-changing for you. Why?

The Path of Least Resistance: Learning to Become the Creative Force in Your Own Life by Robert Fritz.

Years ago, I was in a business class, and this was one of the recommended books. It was about goal-setting but framed in a positive way, so that it keeps you on the path of achieving your goals. It made a huge difference in my life.

Tell us about your favorite author(s).

[John Irving], the author of *The Cider House Rules* and *A Prayer for Owen Meany*. They're weird, but they do provoke a response from me. I like nonfiction mostly, but not any particular author.

What magazines or newspapers do you read? How many articles do you read to the end?

The San Diego Union-Tribune (80 percent of articles); Wall Street Journal (40 percent); New York Times; Newsweek (70 percent); The Economist; various professional journals.

Tell us about your friends you talk to about your reading. What are their tastes like? What are your conversations like?

I like to talk to friends and family. I have sisters and a sister-in-law who are big readers. I also belong to a book club that I get to sporadically. Several of my [siblings] are teachers one was a reading teacher, and I have a brother who taught English. They're good at guiding the discussion! Our conversations are thinking through the books; sometimes we get off track. We also talk as much about what we're reading in the press. I like that. There's nothing like disagreeing comfortably with people — expecting someone to see things the way you do and then being completely surprised that they don't. I wish more people were comfortable doing that.

My husband once said, "I will never be jealous of another man, but I will be jealous of your books!"

Whoa Is Me Armada guitarist Dennis Rohde can tell you about hell. "I've been at practice rooms. I leave and go outside and vomit and go through all kinds of hell. But I know I have to go back in and be peppy and happy."

Rohde, who has played guitar for ten years, says his path to substance abuse started when he was playing IV football at Santa Fe Christian. "I was 120 pounds," says Rohde, 25, who says he now weighs in at 125. "I played on the defensive line. I had to hit 300-pound guys as hard as I possibly could." He got hurt. "That and a snowboard incident introduced me to the world of painkillers." Rohde says he became immersed in drugs, which included but was not limited to painkillers.

"I was the scourge of Rancho Santa Fe." He says he ended up at Torrey Pines High after he was kicked out of Santa Fe Christian "for bad grades and giving drugs to



other football players. The principal hated me. I was infiltrating a circle of cleanliness."

Rohde graduated from Torrey Pines, although he still was using serious drugs. "You name the opiate, I got it." He ended up in rehab.

"They wouldn't let us have records so I would steal

CDs from a record store nearby. I listened to Johnny Cash records every single day in rehab. The reason certain rehab programs don't work is because they don't allow people to have an outlet during the program to let out their emotional baggage. It was always their way or the highway."

In Rohde's case, it was the highway. "I got kicked out the first time because a nurse walked in on me and a girl and a mountain of blow."

After his ejection from rehab, life wasn't pretty. "I kept crashing and burning. My body began deteriorating. I was close to dying. I had seizures that were so long I shouldn't be here. I contemplated killing myself every day for months."

His second rehab stay was more successful. Rohde says he's been clean for two years without the benefit of a 12-step program. "You don't have to do it that way.... If I didn't have music and wasn't allowed to have my band, I would be dead. This is my only escape."

All Armada songs ("We

call it 'experimetal,' dark-space rock") tell a story about the struggle. "'Whoa Is Me' is about when you reach the base of hell and there is nothing south of that. 'Icicle' is about letting go of the anchors that hold you down, frozen in one place. 'Gargantua' is about staying focused. I think there isn't a person in the world who hasn't been through something cyclic in their life. Anyone who has had a low point in their life knows what we're driving at.'

The Armada (*myspace.com/* thearmadamusic) appears at the Casbah on Sunday and at

'Canes August 16.

Props for Mono Mono

"I bring exploding foam, snow machines, confetti cannons, piñatas, and remote-control spaceships," says Jeffrey Beringer, a.k.a. Mono Mono, of his "interactive and inflatable" solo performances. Interactive? "The lights and other special effects are operated by radio control, and I give control boxes to the audience," he says. "I dress in drag and sit on your lap...[audiences] blow my clothes off with my leaf blower, and I run naked

through the venue.' Okay. Inflatable? "I have an arsenal of inflatable monkeys, sex dolls, and blow-up toys," he says. "I put on an inflatable sumo costume and blow up like a huge, obese marshmallow man, and [audiences] squeeze, hug, grind, hump, and bounce me." Musically, he says, "I have help from my iPod and my computer.... The vocals are live, and the music and sound effects have been electronically programmed. I use Reason

and Ableton Live loop-

sequencer programs."

Some venues don't appreciate his props. "I had a fight with the stage manager and engineers at the House of Blues," he says. "Before I walked onstage, they said [HOB] was 'not for clowns' and that they didn't have sufficient staff to clean up streamers or confetti."

According to Beringer, "Over 20 of my inflatable monkeys have been

egative Filter is a three-piece hard-rocking band that began playing gigs in Tijuana and music festivals across the state of Baja. They now live in San Diego and rock out stateside.

"As for politics, right now Tijuana is on state and city elections season," says bass player Joel Sotomayor, "and our political system has changed for the best. Our

democracy is pretty young. It's getting stronger, and the main focus on governments now is the transparency of activities done by public officials, to prevent corruption. Freedom of speech now is a major factor. Before 2000 no one could make fun of the president without feeling in danger, but now we make fun of politicians freely.

How is the Tijuana music scene?

"There are mostly indie bands," Joel says, "like Lahbia, Ambiente, and there are also the experimental progressive bands like Casa Wagner, the Nortec Collective, of course, and alternative weird acoustic like Ballena de Jonás. A lot of hardcore, punk, ska, and emo bands that I don't like, but some of them are recognized not only in Mexico but Latin America, so I respect that. I think right now there is kind of a boom because there are more places where artists can perform, like MOFO bar, Sotano de Rita, Box Underground, Casa de la 9, Multikulti, Hard Rock, just to name a few. And of course the usual rave parties at the beach, and house parties for bands, those are always fun, not to mention the boom in norteño music and rancheras!"

Joel is joined by Danny J. on guitar and Jon Shimmin on drums.

TRICKIEST PROBLEM PLAYING LIVE?

Danny: "It's hard to adapt to different venues the stages and equipment are different. I don't have enough time to even take a deep breath before starting."

Jon: "Finding a place to set up all my drums and cymbals, if there is a band before us. So you prestage the equipment in some form, and when it's your

turn to take the stage it's a hustle to get it all up there and set just right, then try to take a few breaths to chill out and then immediately try to perform a solid set. When you're done, it's back to moving

equipment...the actual playing is the easiest part of the whole thing.'

Danny: "A showcase in L.A. We had been rehearsing the night before in a very hot and stuffy room; afterward we spent the rest of the night hanging out in cooler weather. The next day I woke up surprised by the fact that I could not move. I had been having back pains all week, and with the change in temperature from the night before, I had some type of muscle spasm. I could barely walk, let alone hold a guitar and sing. The band was freaking out because this was supposed to be an important showcase. Long story short, I was given muscle relaxants and painkillers because I was going to perform even if I had to do it lying on the floor. I guess I don't need to say that the ride was very relaxing, and by the time we got onstage I was feeling pretty good.

Joel: "A few weeks ago at the Jumping Turtle. We drank a few beers before the show started. At the middle of our set we each drank a double shot of tequila, so when the show ended we hung out with a bunch of friends in the back of the Turtle and, well, like 90 percent of the people were wasted and the other 10 percent drunk. So it was fun.'

WORST GIG?

Danny: "The second Negative Filter show at a bar in Escondido. The manager greeted us with a

decibel reader that would peak with every snare hit. We had to play very low, which was something that we are not used to. The sound was terrible; we had to play with our own rehearsal equipment because they had no PA, but the worst part was that we were playing for a middle-aged drunken crowd that just kept screaming, 'We want to hear the Eagles! We want covers!

Joel: "A show we did at a bar on University Avenue, they had a PA only for the voice, and there wasn't a lot of people. I could barely hear Jon or Danny, but at least we didn't fuck it up.

Jon: "A dive hole — the sound was bad; all you could hear onstage were cymbals. Danny couldn't even hear his own voice. Then we forgot to get paid so I had to go back several times just to get our 20 bucks or whatever silly amount it was.

Maybe more influence by Asian cultures — a couple of years ago I heard this band called Dir en Gray, now they're opening for the Deftones. So a lot of Asian influence coming our way. I think right now is a good time to experiment with sounds, thanks to all soft synths and other music software. Your imagination and your processor are your only limitations.

Jon: "I have a feeling musicianship is going to come back a little more. Seeing a band like Avenged Sevenfold come out and Tool getting more progressive — that's what I'm hoping for. Although the music biz seems to be at its worst right now, I think bands will make a comeback people are going to get tired of the Britney, Christina, and Justin stuff." ■





During the '80s, when the alien sounds of electronic drum machines and synthesized keyboards dominated the pop music landscape. Tears for Fears was like a good blast of testosterone. True, their hairstyles were as complex as anyone else's in the day, and their sense of artistry was grounded in fashion as much as basic four-chord rock. But they managed to punch through the regrettable mess of bad radio and MTV drama with silvery, timeless works that found ready audiences both here and in their native Britain. Based on the strength of a couple of hits from 1985's Songs from the Big Chair, TFF founders and public faces Curt Smith and Roland Orzabal became superstars. Later, they would be compared to another famous British songwriting team, Lennon and McCartney. But it wouldn't last. If 1989's masterpiece *The Seeds of Love* proved to be TFF's swan song, it also marked the beginning of the end of a friendship. By 1992 Orzabal and Smith had ended things in a bad way and had little, if any, contact with each other for the rest of the decade.

Orzabal furthered the TFF brand on his own, but over time it became clear that any songwriting

witchcraft had come from the alliance. Smith's post-TFF work was marginal, and Orzabal, considered the dominant musician of the two, wandered through song styles and wrote lyrics that, obscure and open to interpretation at their TFF best, had lapsed into childish rhymes.

The Beatles magic was indeed an influence on Tears for Fears — listen to "Sowing

the Seeds of Love," a direct visit to the *Sgt. Pepper's* songbook. It is a sound that TFF would (wisely) exploit again on 2004's *Everybody Loves a Happy Ending.* TFF's new music? As strong as ever, but whether it's a happy ending remains to be seen.



Let's get what's wrong with this album out of the way: the recording quality couldn't compete with a Fisher-Price My First

Karaoke boom box coupled with a Maxell metal tape. Blair's vocals would get him kicked off American Idol in the first three bars. Wood misses a quitar note here and there. And the lyrics bear overwrought imagery of "the Reaper," "the vulture," doors, and being buried in the earth. (Lyrics, for example, from "No Exit" and "The Vulture.")

What's right with the album? Everything else. Amateur doesn't equal bad, and these guys are better than most and have a solid foundation to start a career in music. Mellor holds up his end of the bargain with popping and ringing drums and percussion. Wood's guitarwork evokes an idea of Soundgarden's Kim Thayil, and the melodic piano and synthesizer, played by lead vocalist Trent Blair, displays inspiration, talent, passion, and training.

Give these guys a couple of years of practice, a more sophisticated list of lyrical influences, and

noticed my camera a few feet away from the rest and kicked it as if it were a Hacky Sack into the pile.

A German shepherd was brought in to sniff the cameras, I assumed for bombs. A guy who reminded me of Dean Martin stumbled up next to me with a drink in his hand. 

near the elevators and placed my plate on the table next to it. At the other end of the table there was a second chair that a woman snapped up. After she placed her food down, her mother and husband came over. I offered up my chair. At first they refused, but I insisted. I brought it over to them and ate standing up like everyone else.

When I went to the

hall where Clinton was going to speak, I was told media was in the back. I asked someone in the Secret Service if I could take a picture during the speech. "Absolutely not," I was told. I asked the agent if I could take a picture of him, and he said, "Can't you just find some good-looking guy and say he's Secret Service?" When Clinton started talking at length about North Korea and other international issues, my eyes glazed over. It was like a boring history class. I was kept from falling asleep by the idiot in front of me on his cell phone. I counted eight people who looked back at him hoping he'd get

the message. At one point, he put a finger in his ear as someone went "Shhhh!" I wondered if he said into the phone, "Sorry, I can't hear you. There's some president talking."

Spare, Well-Spoken

Tesnjak makes no visual attempt too tweak Hamlet with obvious modern angles.

ou learn a lot about a director's concept of *Hamlet* the instant the guards appear. I've seen everything from German storm-troopers to surreptitious CIA types — gray suits, sunglasses, ominous smirks — to generic sol-

diers, Barnardo with a broadsword, Francisco an Uzi. Darko Tresnjak's *Hamlet* opens with guards in armor and chain mail, so heavy-laden they move

as if arthritic. Tresnjak makes no visual attempt to tweak *Hamlet* with obvious modern angles. In effect, we see the play in Shakespeare's time, a turbulent world of ghosts, hellfire, and divine right of kings. The look's so apt, you want to quote Francisco, "for this relief" — from forced significance and contemporary narcissism — "much thanks."

Robert Morgan's excellent costumes bespeak the era. Women wear great-sized dresses and board-stiff bodices, their hair drawn back; the bearded, mustachioed men, wide-shouldered garb. All wear ruff collars, which look like fallen halos, the size depending on social status. King Claudius and recent wife Gertrude gleam with pearls and flecks of gold. Their clothes are so detailed they could pose for a van Eyck. Every move flickers in the candlelight, as if lit from within.

The spare, well-spoken production has some questionable choices. The most memorable effect comes just before the first-act curtain. After the players stage "The Murder of Gonzago," Hamlet's "mousetrap" to observe the King's reaction, a long bolt of red silk drops from the upper platform. It fans across the lower stage, like a roiling sea. Then it disappears, revealing Hamlet and Horatio delighted that their trap succeeded. It's a beautiful, blazing image, but it breaks the production's clean, minimalist style.

Other choices irk: like the gratuitous violence when Fortinbras wrings Osric's neck. More disturbing, Ophelia, it turns out, is pregnant. Previous stagings, wanting an explicit motivation for her madness/suicide, have done this. But it goes against the text and her protestations of virtue. Worse, that she's pregnant makes her (and Hamlet) a liar. Ophelia's one of the few characters in *Hamlet* who isn't two-faced, who

isn't given to "ambiguous giving out." (Actor Michael Pennington says, "She isn't so much mad as unacceptably sane.") If we can't trust Ophelia's words, then something's *really* rotten in the state of Denmark.

In Jack O'Brien's staging, over a decade ago, Richard Easton was a remarkable Claudius: the life-loving, power-breathing King finally had it all, save for this gnat-

like nuisance, dressed in black and whining to himself. Bruce Turk's Claudius has little upside; he's just villainous, almost to the point of twisting his trim moustache.

Charles Janasz's Polonius is near perfect. Actors want to make the old man just a clown, but he's not. As Janasz plays him, Polonius is a state department official but past his prime. He still has moments of insight (seeing the "method" in Hamlet's madness) but also lapses into encroaching senility that make him say foolish, often funny things. Janasz's Polonius, rightfully, is a comic character against his wishes.

The younger cast members, especially Corey Sorenson's Laertes and Joy Farmer-Clary's Ophelia, both one-note strident, emote the ends of their scenes at the beginning. And the minor characters project the sense that they're in Hamlet; the guards don't just guard, for example, they guard. But few Danskers know what's going on (even fewer that they're in a Shakespearean tragedy). The rest should perform their functions and maintain the appearance of normalcy at Elsinore Castle.

Celeste Ciulla's showcasing her versatility at the outdoor stage this summer. She plays haughty Lucetta in *Two Gents*, bawdy Mistress Overdone in *Measure for Measure*, and Queen Gertrude in *Hamlet*, the last a passionate woman in denial and an assertive force when she realizes she's been doubly wronged.

The night I caught his performance, Lucas Hall did a metamorphosis. At first he was just acting Shakespeare (and watching himself do it): he cried his tears, raised and lowered his voice at appropriate spots (and his arms, often stiffly in the cruciform position). And he never figured out how much "antic disposition" he

should use. About two-thirds through, however, it was as if Hall grasped the impossibility of Hamlet's plight: revenge a death, kill the king, but stay pure and "taint not" his mind. Instead of just saying his lines, suddenly Hall *meant* them. From that point on, Prince Hamlet walked the stage.

Dr. Floyd Gaffney passed away last week. The UCSD emeritus professor of drama lived a life in the theater that enriched us all. His production of Fugard's *Boesman and Lena*, two decades ago at the ECC, is an all-time favorite. Floyd was such a major local voice, especially for African-American theater, it's impossible to summarize his achievements on the stage and behind the scenes, where he helped so many people. God, we'll miss him!

In Tom Stoppard's masterpiece, everything occurs twice, like a mathematical iteration - only differently. It takes place at Sidley Park, a country estate in Derbyshire, in 1809-1812 and in 1989:

same room, same table, different worlds. Stoppard called his play "a thriller and a romantic tragedy with jokes." The description's apt (he also could have added that it looks at two eras when chaos replaced order). Cygnet Theatre's opening-night performance brimmed with insights (director Sean Murray knows this play in all its complexities) but offered a mixed bag of acting. As Bernard, Claudio Raygoza's so clear and connected, everyone else seems a beat or two behind (the energy would perk up if actors having to explain things understood them better). Rosina Reynolds smartly plays Hannah as romantically icy but full of emotion when sleuthing her subject. Matt Biedel gives an assured, funny performance as Septimus (from whom Lord Byron might have stolen his "Byronic style). At times Rachel Van Wormer's Thomasina (math genius 100 years ahead of the times) was too blaring, and others, as in the unforgettable ending, when she radiated. The production has a sleek, elegant look. The play's full of doublings, many ghostlike. Eric Lotze visually underscores the duality by having actors reflected on the French windows.

Worth a try.

Sex comes to Sesame Street. If age 30 is the new 20, then Jeff Whitty (book), Robert Lopez, and Jeff Marx (music and lyrics) have written a musical for this out-ofschool-but-groping-for-purposein-life generation. Actors and puppets, both expressive, perform before a brownstone façade (Avenue Q being a step down from New York's "Hell's Kitchen") and go where Muppets feared to tread: they sing not about letters of the alphabet but racism, porn on the Internet, and how "It Sucks to Be Me." They struggle with work and love and, hounded by the Bad Idea Bears — on loan from PB? the urge to slack. The energized ensemble has no weak links. Robert McClure, Carla Renata, Angela Ai, and especially Kelli Sawyer, who does Broadway quality work and manipulates Kay Monster, a puppet, are quite impressive. The tinny miking system, which slurs words and even whole jokes, makes them sound as if they have clothespins on their noses. The Tony Award-winning musical's equal parts iconoclastic and cutsie but is always crisp and very funny.

Worth a try.

The Break-Up Notebook: The Lesbian Musical

Early in the Lori Scarlett/Patricia Cotter musical comedy, Helen dives under her office desk. Asked what she's looking for, the recently dumped woman says, "Oh, something tiny, my self-esteem." To rid her of her ex-, she doesn't need a therapist, she needs an exorcist. Break-Up Notebook traces the slow process of healing from major emotional hurt to, a song pro-claims, "Coming Back to Me." The show's longish (ten minutes could go from each act) but always funny, and the pop score's both witty and emotionally resonant. Performing before a wall of blue notebook paper, Diversionary Theatre's cast, smartly directed by Peter Schneider, does triple duty: singing, dancing, playing Helen's various friends (Andy Collins is a hoot as Bob, especially doing the "Chicks and Dicks Bossa Nova") and potential lovers (including Melissa Fernandes's hilarious line dancing teacher in recovery, "the 12-stepping two stepper"). Make that quadruple duty, since they change Jeanne Reith's always appropriate costumes in split seconds. New to San Diego, multi-talented Beth Malone has a special audience-rapport and carries the show as Helen.

Worth a try.



Lamb's Players Theatre, which has staged the Andrew Lloyd Webber/Tim Rice musical before, has a flair for its irrepressible spirit. Their current production, with Deborah Gilmour Smyth belting out the story of Joseph's coat of many colors, and smooth-voiced, likable Spencer Moses in the lead, releases that spirit once again. Webber's eclectic score, from calypso to Elvis, feels like a Whitman's Sampler of his versatility. The nine-member cast gives and gives. The musical was Webber and Rice's first collaboration, composed without the budgetary largess that has overloaded their musicals with gaudy effects ever since. For those who remember Lamb's earlier, much more humble efforts, this is a Joseph with a budget. Instead of a Vegas-chintz look, the set and costumes are upscale (Michelle Hunt's quality outfits take so much time to change that onstage actors must stretch the interludes to accommodate them, which results in stop-and-go pacing). The show remains a crowd-

pleaser. But the sense of humble, scavenger-hunt improvisation is gone. It's as if *loseph* got moved from Glitter Gulch to a tonier part of the Strip. (Note: due to popular demand, Lamb's has twice extended its run.)





The Gift of Deliciousness

It started with an e-mail from an unknown sender Who's rojo?" I wondered — friend, Viagrapusher, virus-carrier? A friend I'd never met, it turned out — a reader who shares my tastes, suggesting that I try Clay's, another "view" restaurant, at the top of the towering Hotel La Jolla. That's a space that has been through so many incarnations under its previous name, Elario's, that I'd come to view it with permanent suspicion. (In its final incarnation, I heard, Elario's was serving the worst sort of hotel food, including the same precut packaged "Sysco veggie medley" with every entrée.) But Bobbie, who sent the e-mail, was so articulate in her praises of the year-old Clay's that I rounded up the posse and we made a reservation. And were we ever glad we did!

To revisit the film *Ratatouille*, at the climax, a snooty restaurant critic is won over by a simple peasant dish, overcome by its sheer deliciousness. In my business, it's easy to forget that, ultimately, deliciousness counts most. So there are chefs whose work I respect as high culinary art, and of course they get the big four stars on up. But there are also chefs whose food I love, whose finely tuned palates make them masters of vivacious flavors. I wish I could color-code the stars — black for "respect the art," but hot pink, chartreuse, or turquoise (maybe with some little graphic whiz-bangs, like the movie's depiction of culinary joy) for the chefs whose work sings with flavor — chefs like Patrick Ponsaty (Bernard'O), Brian Sinnott (1500 Ocean), Jason Knibb (910), pastry chef Jack Fisher (Jack's La Jolla), and whoever makes the Peking duck at China Max, to name a few. People often forget the art they ate but may be haunted forever by cravings for another bite of the dishes that tasted the best.

Clay Bordan seems to be one of these chefs. Not every dish we tried was perfect, but a powerful seven of ten were terrific, with vibrant flavors gently borrowing from great cuisines worldwide. The setting for Bordan's cooking is a long, oddly cozy penthouse with low ceilings, thick carpeting, and wide windows facing west, with light curtains that are lifted at sunset to reveal a panorama of La Jolla stretching down to the sea. It's comfortable and attractive but not excessively formal -you can dress for fun in your cutest new outfit without worrying if it's fancy enough for prime time. (I don't mean that new Calvin wife-beater, guys.) On the way in, you pass a large glassed-in open kitchen, affording the visual entertainment of watching the line, but with none of the clatter. Some of the seating is at banquettes, but we preferred the sightlines from a windowside table. Since there's live music in the lounge almost every night, the sound level depends on who's

playing — it was quiet background sound the weeknight we went, but if you don't like loud, avoid Sunday nights when there's usually a retro big band.

for happy hour drinks and snacks, but this was the first time they'd settled in for serious eating. (Again, the curse of Elario's.) As we read the menu, a genuinely amusing

"amuse" arrived — a hospitable round of Kir Royales (champagne with crème de cassis). What could be better? The bubbles wash away the day's

wanted to. Not boring at all.

pancetta and set on skewers that arose from an edible base of ripe, sweet pineapple, surrounded by a crunchy, spicy raw fennel salad with a hotsweet "vindaloo" glaze of Indian spices and sweet-sour tamarind.

Sake-seared sea scallops were sweet, plump

Mano de León specimens from Ensenada. They were set atop pedestals of mashed Peruvian purple potatoes mixed with parsnip purée — a clever idea, since the parsnip offered a moist lightness, sweetness, and texture to cut the starchiness of

these good-looking but dry potatoes. Surrounding them were a deliriously sensual Turkish apricot crème fraîche and a pomegranate-ginger reduction

glazing the plate. The wine that hit the spot with all the appetizers was an old favorite, Edna Valley (Santa Barbara) Chardonnay unpretentious but serious rendition of "delicious." (Cost Plus often carries it on sale, for about a third of the restaurant price. All my tablemates said they'd be looking to buy it by the case.) For the entrées, we switched to miscellaneous pours by the glass, since we'd ordered both fish and meat.

After having read the menu online, I consumed the appetizers with as much relief as joy. Through bitter experience, I've grown leery of non-Asian chefs doing "fusion" by throwing exotic ingredients willy-nilly into their cooking, or worse yet, coming up with creative "improvements" over traditional recipes that need no improving. Poorly done fusion is a form of cultural misappropriation — that is, ripping off non-European cuisines to get ego points: "Thanks for the sansho pepper, Butterfly honey — gotta run now." But there are no soy-drenched mudholes at Clay's — when this chef incorporates



global flavors to enliven his cooking, he employs them intelligently and gracefully where they do the most good.

Not fusion-y at all, however, a perfectly conventional "signature" lobster bisque shouldn't be a signature. The most disappointing of our starters, it was short on lobster flavor — creamy comfort food without much personality, even with the cute little pedigreed-goat cheese dumpling floating in the middle. If "it takes a heap of livin' to make a house a home," then it takes a load of lobster to make a bisque a thrill. There's no lobster on Clay's' menu, which means the kitchen isn't awash in leftover carapaces and spare parts but has to purchase lobster bodies for the base of the broth. I've never yet loved a bisque from a restaurant that doesn't have lobster on its menu — it's not the same as the bisque from a



appetizer he'd enjoyed at happy hour. The concept (raw tuna, mango, and cucumber rounds) may be a cliché, but the execution was spiffy: The layers were piled atop a grilled cake of Thai purple rice, which softened as it absorbed the drippings to a tasty, crunchy-surfaced mush. The zesty seasonings in the tuna included a sharp hit of Thai chile oil and a glaze combining blood orange with English and Dijon mustards. On the side were fried wonton wrappers to scoop with if you

kitchen swamped with leftover shells, swimmerets, and an extra live lobster or two to throw into the pot.

Clay's is evidently accustomed to foodies sharing dinners - our waiter later told us about a regular dining group who call themselves "the Foodies" — because the appetizers arrived by ones and twos to let us savor each in turn. We ordered blue-crab salad as a mid-course, and it duly arrived solo — a warm mélange of substantial chunks of sweet crab (not mere shreds and bits), surrounding islands of butter lettuce, small oval tomatoes, and raspberries. After appreciating its merits for a while, I realized I wasn't totally content with butter lettuce in the context. "I think it needs a more assertive green to go against the Gorgonzola cream," I said. "Maybe raw fennel." Jim thought arugula. Lynne suggested raw Belgian endive, which won the crowd's acclaim, a communal vision of ideal warm blue-crab salad. On second thought - artichoke heart might do it, too.

"Even if the main courses fall down after this, I'm already happy I came," said the Lynnester. But they didn't fall down. We chose entrées as much on the basis of interesting garnishes as the central proteins. Hence, the first one I faced was my fish-of-constantridicule, halibut. It was cooked to soft velvet flakiness - even better than at George's California Modern. At one end, the fillet was topped with purple and dark green "licorice"-flavored microgreens (anise, fennel, arugula, plus radicchio for color), a decorating tactic echoed in the center by slim, garlic-flavored green beans and tiny purple Peruvian potatoes, plus poached white peaches on the side. "Aww, look!" I cooed, uncovering the first petite purple potato. "There's purple and green at the top, and here's the purple with the green beans to match." "The chef could be an interior designer," said Michelle, an interior designer. "He could redo your living room in food."

"I can't believe it, I'm actually clinging to halibut!" I said, when I had to move the plate along on its rotation around the table. Next was Angus filet mignon. It was not quite as rare as I'd hoped. Samurai Jim, the classic beef-eater among us, actually hated the blackberry reduction sauce, the summery soprano substitute for the standard, mellow-alto red-wine bordelaise sauce. The rest of us liked the beef and sauce well enough, but what really won us all over (Jim included) were the side dishes — a succulent little gratin of potatoes with manchego cheese, plus roasted red pearl onions, grilled white asparagus, and sautéed garlic spinach.

Maple Leaf duck breast is the standard duck in local restaurants, but rarely is it served as rare as it ought to be. Here it was — darkly rosy, utterly tender, set atop dreamy,

thin-skinned butternut squash ravioli with garlic cream sauce, spinach, and plushy reconstituted oven-dried tomatoes. (I can't believe they were really ever dried. They tasted freshbaked.) We were all jazzed as the plate made its way around the table. The difference between great duck breast and boring duck breast? Ten degrees less cooking and zap, OFF with the heat!

The major entrée disappointment was pan-seared Jidori chicken breast, from an aristocratic, flavorful Japanese breed. Even with Jidori, nicely cooked breast is still breast and needs more help to become something wonderful, rather than just (vawn) white meat. Here it was cooked plainly, accompanied by yummy fennel-scented goat cheese mashed potatoes, grilled ramps (wild scallions, in the final week of their season), baby carrots glazed with lychee-infused sake from Japan, and pan jus. (Next evening, the doggie-bagged Jidori leftovers were reincarnated into fabulously flavorful chilaquiles — much tastier than "any-old-chicken" chilaquiles.)

Desserts are exhibited on one of those sampler platters equivalent to the plastic food displays in the window of a Tokyo restaurant. We (meaning the chocoholic samurai) chose a layered chocolate pastry-thing. It proved as exciting as a plastic window display (ditto the espresso). It turns out that, due to the small size of the kitchen

(and Clay's own disinclination for baking), most desserts at the restaurant are purchased from a contractor. But sweets are superfluous anyway, when you've already extracted so much pleasure from the earlier courses.

We'd arrived early and were second-last to leave. I rode down the elevator with Jim, and after powder-room breaks, Lynne and Michelle rode down with our handsome waiter. Michelle, a petite pretty blonde, marched in lockstep with the waiter toward the back parking lot. "Whoo-hoo, we're over here," Jim called from the other exit door. (Sorry, Michelle, it was too cute a moment to go unrecorded. Writers are dangerous friends.) Then we all poured into Jim's car and glowed all the way back to town. "This has been surprisingly...divine," said the Lynnester, surprising herself with the razzle-dazzle adjective. Yes, surprisingly divine.

ABOUT THE CHEF

Chef Clav Bordan has primarily worked as a corporate chef, which is basically a teaching position — that is, "I'd go to all these cities, and I'd put together restaurants [including the opening of Nectar, downtown], put together menus, bring in staffs, go through the build-out stage, be there for the opening, stay there for a month or two, and hand it off to my chefs,' he says. "But a lot of these restaurants were in hotels, and we'd get interference from the

hotel management. They were more interested in saving money than in keeping that creative edge, so I wasn't always happy doing that.

The company I was with, American Property Management, bought this hotel about two years ago.... They had a couple of third-party operators doing the restaurant here, Elario's, and one day they came to me and said, 'You've got to go to Elario's and babysit it.' So I started working with the people here, and I really didn't have much interest in the menu — it was just hotel food, you wouldn't even give it two stars. I was bored, and about three months afterwards...I suggested to the company that I'd take it on myself, but I'd quit my job as a corporate chef. They said, 'Well, okay, but we won't give you any money to get started.'

Clay took on the challenge, along with his crew - scrounging furniture from another closed restaurant, redecorating the room, and finally reopening not as Elario's but as the radically different Clav's. "We launched Clay's July 11 of last year. We changed the menu, changed the menu again, until we got to where we are now a decently run restaurant. I haven't had any turnover, and my guys have basically bought into the concept. I took a huge cut in pay, and we're still working really hard." He maintains high standards for his kitchen. "My philosophy is: no shortcuts. And if one of the line-chefs messes up — say, he overcooks something — I want him to throw it out and start over, rather than serve it if it's not perfect. Partly, because I see us as primarily a local restaurant. We're not on the Prospect strip, we don't get many tourists. We're more interested in building a base of regular local customers who'll come back again and again because they like what we're doing.'

Clay never meant to become

a chef. His family moved around a lot for his father's job when he was a kid; they spent the longest stretch in Florida, which Clay considers his home state. (His speech still bears a trace of the South.) He began learning to cook out of necessity. "My mother would only cook one meal a day, dinner. She didn't believe in premade foods, she didn't believe in processed items. If we wanted something to eat, we had to make it ourselves. My parents called me 'the Scrounger,' because I was always going into the refrigerator and grabbing stuff out of there and making something out of it, because that's what we had to do. As I hit my teens, I wanted a bigger allowance, and my father said, 'Well, go out and get a job.' So at 14 I got a job dishwashing in a restaurant, and that led to cooking. But I did anything not to become a chef. When I started out it wasn't glamorous no Food Network, no celebrity chefs. I learned on the job — never went to cooking school or to business school. I worked under some really good people, good chefs, but nobody very famous, and I never staved long — I was always trying to find a way out of it. I was young and I was working every weekend, every holiday. I kept trying to do other things for a living, but I finally had to say, 'Well, I actually love cooking.'

"I love it even more now, because I've been through that corporate side. Now I'm in it, I can do what I want. I can change my menu all the time based on what the market's trending to — or not. But moving around a lot as a corporate chef, I got to see a lot of areas people wouldn't pay money to go to, a lot of grassroots stuff like Amish cooking. A lot of foodie places and a lot of nonfoodie places — something's always there to spark my interest.'

Clay's sophistication as a chef may seem mysterious until you realize that, even though he's never traveled outside of America, he's a foodie to the bone. "I love eating out, I do it as much as possible — at obscure places serving authentic dishes. I'll get cravings for Indonesian food, for spicy Chinese food.... Right now I'm planning to take a couple of days off in September to fly to Boston, just to eat dinner at a Chinese restaurant in the area (it's called Kowloon), and fly right back the next day, because I miss my favorite dishes there so much." ■

Base Pies

"That's the Connecticut difference."

I swear. That's what East Village is becoming.

It hit me the other night. I was bouncing down 10th in the Number 11 bus, at about 11:00, head-

ing for 12th and Imperial. That's when I noticed the party. You could see through the big industrial windows: the place was hopping. People chowing down at tables and bars. This was one happy old brick warehouse.

The only sign I could see was a little yellow vertical banner on a pole. "Pizza," it said, and above that, "Basic."

Fast-forward to this evening, near the ballpark. I'm walking east on J when I come across an old brick building near Tenth.

This has to be it. Gotta take a mosey. Wow. Big hangar doors are slid wide open, so half the inside is open to the street. And the interior is like an old warehouse, with a naked, arched timber ceiling; girders; steel reinforcements to hold up those brick walls; and a long bar against the western wall. In the middle is a lounge area separated off by what looks like hanging curtains of chain mail. And to the right, there's the corner section I saw from the bus.

This evening it's busy, but not crazy — yet. Good to see it's not only freshly tattooed twentysomething urbanistas but some middle-aged folks and a few oldies too. Gives it a neighborhood feel. I go, natch, to the long counter-bar, a second one they have over at the east end. Trent comes up to take my order. I ask for a coffee. I see — too late — that they're three bucks. What can you do? I check the menu after he leaves. It's basic, all right. Like, you have a choice: pizza or salad. The "base pies" are either red or white. Red

means you get the tomato paste (for \$8 small, \$13 large), white means you've got olive oil, garlic, and Parmesan cheese (also \$8 small, \$13 large). Pay an extra buck to add mozzarella to the small, two for the large. Then add toppings, the usual

suspects, from onion to pepperoni to meatballs and anchovies, and two interesting ones at the end of the list, mashed potato and littleneck clams. 'Course I'm counting my shekels, so I just go for the red pie with mozzarella and pepperoni.

What they don't tout on the menu, or what even Trent doesn't mention, is that we're talking pioneering pizzas here. Turns out these guys make the only true-blue Connecticut pizzas in San Diego. Why such a deal about pizzas from New Haven, apart from the fact that that's where the movie Mystic Pizza was

It turns out New Haven is nothing less than the birthplace of American pizza. New Haven was where one Frank Pepe immigrated to from Italy and in the early 1900s started putting tomato on top of old bake-shop bread. People loved it, and the first American pizza was born. In 1925 he opened his first real pizzeria, and the rest, as they say, is pizza-ry.

Oh man. When my pie arrives I realize how big the "small" is, an 18-inch oval, and it comes on this way-big aluminum tray. The other thing is how incredibly thin the crust is.

That's the Connecticut difference," says this guy who's chatting with Trent. Jon Mangini. Young guy. Whoa. He's the owner, from New Haven. "We invented it," he says. "We make the thinnest pizza in the country. And we still bake them in brick ovens back there. Plus, we have less

crust, and they're always delivered on big rectangular baking pans."

Mmm. The crust's extreme thinness allows the taste of the toppings to come through really rich and unadulterated.

Jon's an interesting guy. When he found this old warehouse in 2004, he gutted it and hauled all the detritus out, but he didn't strip it. It dates back to 1912, according to Jon (others say 1918, but what the heck, it's old either way), and used to be a horse carriage repair shop. Jon and the building's owner resisted the temptation to "modernize" the place. Instead, it's been allowed to revert beautifully to its original look. It's come back to life, and, because of Jon, life has come back

He has made a kind of "relaxing room" between the two bars by hanging a metal "cascade coil curtain," like loose, swaying chain mail. The fixtures above the big bar are glass tubes with motor oil in them so they give off a golden light. The "rugs" in the seating area are actually old bike tire flakes. The oversize purple-felted pool table is an antique Brunswick. It all feels original. It's cool just to stand around staring, listening for the whinnies of horses past.

Maybe that's why people flock here. Because they do. These guys are so crowded weekends, and when the Padres are at home, fuggedaboudit. But I've got to come back. I see some folks eating a white pizza with, hey — is this Connecticut, too? — a layer of mashed potatoes with cheese melted on top, bacon, and red peppers.

Who ever heard of a mashed-potato pizza? Gotta come and try it. And maybe next time it'll be happy hour, when they pass around pizza samples.

I officially admit defeat after knocking off only four slices. These suckers are deceptive. Trent gives me a box to put the rest in.

One thing I know: With what I bring home, I'll be scoring high with Carla. This could keep us going for days. Foodwise, relationshipwise.

Spanish Horses, Spanish Wine

found that there was money in growing grapes," says William Holzhauer, recalling his first investigations into the production end of the wine business. "But there's a lot of money in a winery — because the risk is

in making the wine." He was already set on putting in grapes on Hacienda de las Rosas, his dream estate in Ramona, and he decided he might be up for the risk. "I started going to classes at UC Davis and started showing up at people's vineyards at harvest and volunteering: Shadow Mountain,

Salerno, Pamo Valley Vineyards." Eventually, he started making his own product over at Salerno's place from locally purchased fruit: Zinfandel Port, Sauvignon Blanc, and a Cab-Petite Sirah blend.

Today, Holzhauer's estate winery is still a few months away from completion, but there's enough there to get a sense of it. The mission-style bell tower is up on the winery façade. The ironwood main doors have arrived from Morocco. And you can see the layout — the sections set aside for the barrels, the tanks, the tasting room, the stables.

The stables? "We'll showcase horses here," explains Holzhauer. "We'll bring in stallions, and babies and their moms. We raise Peruvian Paso

horses here. Spanish horses, Spanish wine — tie them together." Spanish wine here means Tempranillo — and Mission (!). "It used to be the number-one grape in Anaheim," he says — back when Anaheim was wine country. "It was their

table grape and their wine grape. There were hundreds of acres of it. It's a spicy grape. People say you can't make great wine from it. Well, you can if you know what you're doing. It's a great blending wine." So, once the estate vineyards come online, he'll be blending it with Tempranillo.

The wine and the horses are personal passions, but Holzhauer is happy to mix them for the sake of consumer-friendly ambiance. To aid in the cultivation of that Spanish image, he says, "We're working with an historical society out in St. Augustine, Florida. We hope they're going to let us copy a wine bottle that was found on a Spanish galleon from the 1400s. It's the only glass wine bottle [of its kind] in the U.S. We're in negotiations to copy it and manufacture it. It's a weird bothe gestures to indicate its irregularity -"they're all going to be a little bit individual. I want to put Mission and Tempranillo in there, put a Spanish doubloon on the glass itself, and call the wine Pieces of Eight. People want the romance: they want the story of your winery, the story of your vineyard. When I go out selling my wine, I'm selling the story on the side: Peruvian Paso horses, Father Serra, the missions, Spanish-style wines..."

He's also looking at enlisting the missions in his effort to build the brand and to promote California's viticultural history in the bargain. "I'm working with the Mission Society right now to raise enough funds to go back and replant Mission grapes at the missions themselves. We're working with the plant foundation

at UC Davis. We'll just put in a couple of trellises, so that people will get the idea that grapes were there. They don't have to make any wine from it, but it's great publicity, for us and for the missions."

It's not all Spanish, all the time — Holzhauer also grows Cabernet and Syrah to go along with the wines he makes from purchased fruit. But he understands the importance of finding a niche, even — perhaps especially — in a niche market. "We have some great winemakers in San Diego County, but very few marketers. I may be one of only two or three people going out there and knocking on doors: 'Hey, you want to buy some

Holzhauer likes the work, except when he doesn't. "I've walked away from some tastings some of these wine bars where they're 'Listerining' my wine" — taking a sip, then sucking air into their mouths to aerate the wine. "I know the reasons why they do it, but it makes no sense to me.

It's a still wine: I didn't make it to Listerine. I said, 'If your clients do that, then they need to drink your wine.' When you're sitting down and having a glass of wine, are you doing that?"

So far, he's met with a measure of success: "restaurants, wine bars, Albertsons...at dinner, the Spanish restaurants sell a lot of wine." Having Spanish varietals "is kind of like a whole package: 'Hey, that fits in!' " Now, a number of other local wineries have signed on to have him carry their product as well. "The Spanish thing might not go over so well at an Italian restaurant, but then, hey, I've got Salerno.'

And in at least one instance, he's found that there is strength in numbers, even — perhaps especially — in a niche market. "Once, I was at a pouring, and this lady came up and said, 'This is really good wine; I'd like to sell some in my stores.' You never know where a lead is going, so I started making nice. Then she said, 'But I don't want just

one winery.' So I pulled out our brochure and said, 'I know about 12 wineries...' It turns out she's the CEO of a car-wash company. There are two locations in Rancho Bernardo and one in Carmel Valley, and they have a beer-and-wine license. They've got a huge room with cards and gifts and wine. I said, 'Why don't we just make a display?' So I got a barrel, cut it up, and put it back together, so that there were windows in the barrel — you can see the wine inside. Then we put a big sign on top that said, 'San Diego County Vintners' Association - Local Wineries.' We use it as a fundraiser. The wineries that participate get \$9.50 a bottle; I sell it for \$10, and we give 50 cents back to the association. I'm on my third reorder; we've got them in seven or eight locations. Alex McGeary up at Shadow Mountain in Warner Springs called me and said, 'I just got a couple who bought one of our wines from the Rancho Bernardo car wash, and they drove all the way up here and bought a case." ■

NORTH COASTAL

Beach Grass Cafe 159 South Coast Highway 101 (one block south of Lomas Santa Fe), Solana Beach 858-509-0632. Formerly a branch of Parkhouse Eatery, Beach Grass has been bought by a mini-chain (with Swami's Cafe and Honey's), but still serves the original recipes. You could eat breakfast here daily and never get bored with the creative morning menu, which includes foamy, fresh orange juice and "Beach Benedict" with eggs and house-made hollandaise on a soft, lush crab cake. Oddly, though, the "maple" syrup and 'butter" spread are both mass-market blends. Lunches and dinners feature multi-ethnic "coastal cuisine," with the best results in seafood dishes like "Moroccan crabcakes" and the fish-n-yam chips (with fine house-made tartar sauce). Vegetable accompaniments are tasty and creative. Reservations essential for weekend breakfasts. Free parking in back via driveway to right of restaurant. Breakfast through dinner daily. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W.

Besta Wan Pizza House 148 Aberdeen Drive (off the 101), Cardiff-by the-Sea, 760-753-6707. This is a North County restaurant that continues to be popular. Their thin-crust East Coast style pizzas are famous locally. Also check for the big-pile spaghetti or lasagna specials if you just want to fill up. Open seven days, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.*

Cafe Zinc 132 South Cedros (at Lomas Santa Fe), Solana Beach, 858-793-5436. The Rancho Santa Fe set like to hang out here in the garden patio with their Porsches at the curb and their shih tzus under the table (dogs are welcome). Even for non-doggie people, the California pepper trees and garden sculp-ture make this indoor-outdoor eatery a really pleasant kick-back place (which gets its name from the zinc-top bar inside). The menu, a mixture of Italian and vegetarian, offers dishes like frittata with cucumber salsa, and baked egg plant "pizzette" (personal-size pizza) with marinara, mozzarella, and Parme san cheese. The vegetarian chili and the Zinc veggie burger (served on a La Brea bun) are tasty too. Open daily, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B.

El Q'ero 564 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-753-9050, You'll feel like a guest at an intimate party eating a leisurely dinner in this small, noisy, pretty dining room. Chef Monica Szepesy offers personalized, home-style renditions of South American cuisines, including house-made beverages. Be sure to try the house's chicha morada, a tangy soft drink made from Peruvian purple corn. The fare includes numer ous types of empanadas, tapas-like small plates, and full-size entrées — most from the family homeland, Peru. Desserts vary nightly and can include a cloud-like *tres leches* cake. Vegetarian and allergy-restricted diets accommodated. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Reservations necessary. Moderate. — N.W.

Firefly 251 North El Camino Real (at Mountain Vista), Suite B, Encinitas, 760-635-1066. At this spacious wine bar and restaurant (sharing a small mall with well-known Savory), the wine list emphasizes California boutique wineries and lesser-known bottlings from around the world, and plentiful choices by the glass make it easy to experiment with unfamiliar wines. The menu starts with a half-dozen wine-bar snacks including a cheese plate and a charcuterie plate. The most popular lunch item is a grand Cobb salad, and at dinner there's a tasty bourbon-and-mustard-brined pork tenderloin. Desserts are a strong suit here, including a creative crème brûlée featuring white chocolate and the fragrant bergamot of Earl Grev tea. For weekend brunches, Firefly does it up big with a long, seductive array of choices including a delicious Dungeness crab Benedict. The menu changes frequently, but this likeable spot feels like a sophisticated neighborhood restaurant where, if you're old enough to enjoy a taste of the grape, you can pretty much come as you are. Open for lunch Monday through Friday, brunch weekends, dinner nightly. Moderate to expensive. – *N.W.*

La Especial Norte 604 North Coast Highway 101 (at Leucadia Boulevard),

Leucadia, 760-942-1040. This big, brightly lit roadhouse sports highly whimsical decor (take a look at the blue ceramic "pond" in the dining room, complete with cayman) and boasts a five-page menu, including a page of a dozen regional soups and another full page for seafood. The soups are superb — the authentic Mexico Citystyle chicken soup is laden with avocados, chicken shreds, cilantro, and rice, and the savory eggplant soup includes airy little "croutons" of puffed relleno batter. The fresh, interesting seafood entrées outshine the relatively ordinary renditions of the standard stuffed-tortilla variations. No wheelchair access to restrooms. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive. - N.W.

Pacifica Del Mar Del Mar Plaza,

1555 Camino Del Mar (at 15th Street), Del Mar, 858-792-1803. The chic crowd is drawn here by Pacific Rim/ Californiafusion cuisine centering on seafood and organic, locally grown produce. It's quality all the way, but some nights the restaurant is a victim of its own success. The riotous overflow crowds can challenge the kitchen's capacities, not to mention diners' tender ears. (Best strategy for pleasure: Reserve for early or late n a weeknight, and ask for patio seating or Room #2.) Fun list of low-priced mini-appetizers, plus great baked oysters, seared scallops, mustard catfish, and house-cured rib eye. The award-winning wine list is half price Thursday nights, and the full bar specializes in creative martinis. "Pacifica Dine-In" offers call-in take-out for selected items. Lunch and dinner daily. Early-bird dinner dis count. Pacifica Breeze Café (a level down) offers savory dishes for breakfast through late lunch daily. Expensive to very expensive. — *N.W.*

Paradise Grille Flower Hill Prome nade, 2690 Via de la Valle (at I-5 offramp), Del Mar, 858-350-0808. There's a new blossom unfolding at the Flower Hill mall, as chef Justin Hoehn hones his mixture of Caribbean, Polynesian, and California coastal cuisines. Creative house-made flatbread serves as a canvas for a wide range of imaginative toppings. Appetizers are witty — grilled skewered shrimp are coated in Rice Krispies and calamari tempura misto includes batter-fried lemon slices, a surprise substitute for the standard lemon wedges. The pistachio-coated salmon entrée arrives precisely cooked to order. Other entrées include guava-glazed pork ribs, horseradish-seared ahi tuna, and

short ribs braised in plum wine. The wine list is long and eclectic. Most desserts come from Opera Bakery, and they're quite good for outsourced sweets. Weekend brunch menu is painfully tempting: Brioche French toast, flatbread with gravlax, crabcakes Benedict, even jerk chicken sandwiches. Open for lunch and dinner weekdays brunch and dinner on weekends. Expensive. — N.W.

Potato Shack Cafe 120 West I Street (off South Coast Highway 101), Encinitas, 760-436-1282. Check out the cute potato-toon mural on the side of the building — a sign for spud-lovers to load up on portions sized for lumberiacks from The Lumberyard across the street. American fries (served "All you can eat!"), French fries, potato patties, and baked potatoes with various toppings are the heart of the menu, along with eggs, omelets, biscuits with sausage gravy, and beer-battered onion rings made from sweet reds. If size counts, consider the daunting inch-thick "manhole" pancake that's bigger than the plate. Lunch runs to "deli" sandwiches (with potatoes), or a hearty bowl of chili con carne. Arrive early weekends. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Savory 267 North El Camino Real, Encinitas, 760-634-5556. Chef-owner Pascal Vignau was executive chef of the Four Seasons Aviara when he decided he wanted his own little place. His casual strip-mall restaurant has been perpetually packed for dinner since opening day. Here he serves a monthly changing menu of Southern French and Mediter ranean cooking spotlighting seasonal lo cal produce. Highlights include an ultra-rich macaroni-and-ham casserole. The adventurous mainly-Cal wine list is remarkably affordable, with many choices available by half-bottles and glasses (and modest corkage if you BYO). Dinner reservations urged; groups larger than ten accommodated with manager's approval. High tea Sat-urday afternoon. Lunch Tuesday through Saturday; dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Moderate. — N.W.

Tom Giblin's Irish Pub 640 Grand Avenue (at Roosevelt Street), Carlsbad Village, 760-729-7234. Occupying the whole of a handsome, sprawling, blocklong Elizabethan-style building, this friendly "small-townish" saloon offers some above-average pub-grub, especially the perfect, moist corned beef with firm-tender cabbage, the huge, lively salads,

and the house-baked brown bread. Boxty (Irish "peasant" potato pancakes, rarely found in California) are done up rather doughy rather than crisp to serve as "wraps" for corned beef and other dishes. Live music Tuesday through Sunday, 9 p.m. to midnight. A large, attractive heated patio next to the parking lot offers some afternoon serenity. Open daily, lunch until late. Inexpensive. —

NORTH INLAND

Abbev's Real Texas BBQ 6904 Miramar Road (at Commerce Street, behind Denny's), Miramar, 858-566-5235. Newer, smaller branch at 9353 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Ruffin Road), Kearny Mesa, 858-279-7427. Texas barbecue consists of meat, chicken, turkey, and links that are repeatedly mopped with a marinade and cooked in a big castiron smoker (rather than grilled over a fire). Here they use mesquite to barbecue the poultry quickly and the brisket ve-r-r-y slowly. In addition to the usual BBQ sides (potato salad, coleslaw, beans, etc.), they offer a Caesar salad. At the Miramar branch the room is large and unadorned but very clean. Wheelchair accessible. Same menu lunch and dinner. Open daily: continuous service for lunch and early dinner weekdays; normal din ner hours weekends. Inexpensive to low moderate. — E.W.

El Bizcocho Rancho Bernardo Inn, 17550 Bernardo Oaks Drive (at Rancho Bernardo Road), 858-675-8500. In this rural golf-and-tennis hideaway, Chef Gavin Kaysen features upscale, creative French-California cuisine, incorporating old-is-new techniques and imaginative combinations of seasonal ingredients. Desserts run fancy and very sweet. The weighty wine tome starts out expensive and goes up from there, with relative bargains at the high end and some half-bottles; by-the-glass choices are just adequate. To find it: Take Bernardo Oaks Drive (a long block west of Pomerado) north to the end of the road, to the RBI parking lot (with validated parking for restaurant-goers). If disabled, specify when you reserve, and they'll set up your table in an accessible area. Otherwise, there's a maze of short staircases to negotiate en route to the restaurant. Tie-and-jacket requirement now relaxed, but still very dressy. Great

Galeon (Escondido) 503 West Mission (at Centre City), Escondido, 760-746-5951. Mexican seafood, along with the usual dishes, is featured in a bright coffee-shop atmosphere with comfortable booths, big windows, a lunch counter and a salad bar. Shrimp and langostino ("squat lobster," in fish ermen's terms) are the house specialties and are well treated. Also consider an intense little marlin taco (squeeze some lime onto this rich, strong fish), or the savory *albondigas* soup (lime it up, too). Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive (standard dishes) to moderate (seafood). — N.W.

Pho Hoa Hiep 9910 Mira Mesa Boulevard, #A, 858-578-1468 (also at 6947 Linda Vista Road, 858-268-8406). This pho (soup) place of the brothers Hoa and Hiep is a clean, busy eatery near hi-tech offices. It's popular at lunch and dinner, partly because of frequent two-for-one deals. Try the #1, Dac Biet Xe Lua, an "extra large bowl" of soup filled with rare steak slices and well-done brisket, flank, tendon, and tripe along with mint and bean sprouts. A popular breakfast *pho* is "French bread with beef juicy cube soup." They also have rice dishes. And try the traditional fruit drinks, maybe the Xam Bo Luong, a combination of logan-berry, black dates, seaweed, and lotus seeds in syrup. Lunch, dinner daily. In-expensive. — E.B.

Rancho Valencia 5921 Valencia Circle, Rancho Santa Fe, 858-759-6216. Nestled in the lush garden setting of the Rancho Valencia Resort is one of San Diego's dining gems. They advertise the cuisine as California-French. Whatever. Every bite from appetizer to dessert is prepared and presented to delight Californians, French people — actually, any person on the planet with taste buds. Enjoy an entrée of prime mesquite-grilled steak, fresh fish, veal, or chicken. Portions are generous, as is the wine list, Casual-elegant dress. Open daily, lunch and dinner; brunch Sunday, Very expensive

Vincent's Sirino's 113 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-745-3835. French-born chef-owner Vincent

Grumel serves Gallic classics in an intimate, small-town bistro setting. This is a cuisine of rich dark sauces robing fine ingredients, such as a huge, flavorful veal chop (no factory calf, that). Mushrooms and vegetables (from local farmers or Grumel's own garden) are the season's best and sensitively treated. Desserts are worth every calorie — save room for the spectacular Bavarian. Full bar, fine wine list. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, din-ner Tuesday through Sunday. Expensive.

LA JOLLA

Great Khan's Mongolian Festival 4545 La Jolla Village Drive (UTC), 858-678-0950. This is a chain that stretches almost as far as the Mongolian Empire, but that's because the idea is good. One meal, plenty of it, and guaranteed fresh because it's either frozen (curled shavings of beef, chicken, turkey, pork) or raw (veggies including cabbage, celery, broccoli, cucumber, green peppers, carrots, mushrooms, pineapple, water chestnuts). Stuff as much as you can into your bowl and hand it to the chef to braise on the huge hotplate, and add noodles. Bonus: gallery view of skaters or an ice hockey match while you eat. Open lunch through dinner week-days, earlier closing weekends. Inexpensive. — E.B.

La Taverna 927 Silverado Street (at Girard Avenue), La Jolla, 858-454-0100. Reservations are a necessity at this tiny trattoria, especially if you'd prefer the relative quiet of the roofed sidewalk patio to the din of the cute but cramped dining room. Look for Italian cooking styles ranging from Tuscan, which showcases pastas with simple fresh sauces, to meatballs and red sauce. Highlights include chef-owner Mary Ann Vitale's house-made Sicilian-style fennel sausage, and if the feather-light potato gnocchi is on special, just say "yes." Save room for a slice of house-made layer cake. Moderate. — N.W.

Piatti Ristorante 2182 Avenida de la Playa, La Jolla Shores, La Jolla, 858-454-1589. Whether you sit inside to enjoy the warm, rustic decor or outside under the giant ficus tree listening to the fountain, you're in for a treat at this secluded restaurant. Meals begin with crunchy corn-studded ciabatta and spicy balsamic dipping sauce, but don't fill up too soon: the appetizers and salads are varied and tasty. All pastas are house made and served with lively, unusual sauces. Lemon-herbed rotisserie chicken, wood-fired pizzas, veal *piccata*, and *bistecca* (a grilled rib-eye steak) round out the entrées. Portions are generous, so pace yourself if you're planning to have one of their house-made desserts. Lunch and dinner daily, brunch also available Saturday and Sunday. Moderate. — S.M.

Sadaf 613 Pearl Street (at Cuvier), La Jolla, 858-551-0643. You worry — those formal fixtures and black-tux waiters, the gold-encrusted paintings, and the crisp, pink table linens all scream "expensive!" Actually, prices are easygoing, especially at lunch. After the basket of complimentary bread, try skewers of chicken or ground filet mignon with rice or salad, or *albalou polo* (rice, dried cherries, and chicken). Pistachio-and-rosewater ice cream is a great finale. Nonspecials and evening meals cost more, but at any price this is real Persian food, with typical riotous herbage and sybaritic spicing. Another branch in the Gaslamp turns into a nightclub after dinner, but the food's better at this La Jolla flagship. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

Tutto Mare 4365 Executive Drive (at Executive Way), Golden Triangle,





Lunch hours roar with chic crowds from the surrounding office buildings, but the kitchen is most on its toes then, too. Pastas come with freshtasting sauces, and substantial seafood salads are available. Entrées (whether seafood or meat) may be overcooked by the fierce wood fires, and most come with minor variations of the same lemon-butter sauce and a one-size-fits-all veggie medley. Full bar, interesting wine list, good happy hour nibbles. Complimentary valet parking. Call for careful directions (very hard to find). Ex-tremely noisy. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner weekends. Pastas and salads moderate, entrées expensive. — *N.W.*

MISSION VALLEY & THE MESAS

Andrés Restaurant 1235 Morena Boulevard, Bay Park, 619-275-4114. This is a cozy cultural surprise on hardto-define Morena Boulevard. The food is flavorful (and not spicy-hot like Mexican and South American dishes). A good introduction to it is *ropa vieja* ("old clothes"): shredded beef sautéed with mushrooms, green pepper, and tomatoes with ever-present rice and black beans. And the Cuban sandwich (roast pork, baked ham, and cheese) shows off the Cuban handling of pork

Other interesting dishes include alca puria (pork and green plantain) and luscious, messy yuca con mojo (yuca root with garlic oil). Open for lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.*

Shanghai City Restaurant 3860 Convoy Street #105 (off Balboa), Kearny Mesa, 858-278-5883. Forget the blah strip mall it hides in — this little piece of Shanghai is a jewel. It feels like one of those century-old places in San Francisco's Chinatown. A two-footlong, satin-silver arowana fish greets you as you come in. Brightly painted dragon columns support a gold dragon arch that leads you into the gold-walled dining room. Mainly, Chinese seem to come here, often eating Shanghai seafood dishes or choosing sumptuous specials like clay hot pots filled with eel and chestnuts or steamed rockfish on a big oval platter. Or, for around five dollars, you can choose lunches like Shanghai chicken, chicken chop suey, or Szechuan pork with crispy noodles soup, steamed rice, a spring roll, and the main item. Open daily 10 a.m. to midnight. Inexpensive to moderate. -

Spice House Cafe 9035 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard (at Complex Drive, courthouse) from across from courthouse), \$58-565-1028. When your "head feels like an old potato" and your "tongue like a button hook" (to quote Kipling), Spice House's answer is their Hangover Omelet. We don't know if it's the Ortega chilies or Jack cheese or super tangy tomato sauce, but some guys swear they feel better for eating it. Other excellent choices include Portuguese sausage with three eggs; Italian sausage frittata with ham, tomatoes mushrooms, and thick French toast topped with strawberries and whipped

cuisine. Breakfast and lunch, closes at 3 p.m. Inexpensive. - E.B.

24-Hour Valley Kitchen Family Restaurant 875 Hotel Circle South, Mission Valley, 619-819-1017 or 619-298-8282. Great when everything else is closed. The place feels like a Midwestern chain eatery: all carpets, darkwood walls, etched glass. Prices are a little up there, but hot French dip is great and burgers are generous. Best news may be that if you feel like breakfast at midnight, no problem. Ask for the pork chops, two eggs, hash browns, and biscuits and gravy. Chops are crumbed and buried in hash browns. Splosh on lots of applesauce, and leave room for the biscuits — their bacon-fat gravy will have you licking the plate. Bonus: You can sit here with a book and a coffee all night long if you like. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.*

THE BEACHES

Brazil by the Bay Restaurant and Sports Bar 3770 Hancock Street, Loma Portal, 619-692-1410. It's not by the bay, but the food is definitely by-thebook Brazilian. You know because the first things you see are *guaraná*, the Amazonian energy drink, and *açaï*, the Amazonian zonian palm berry energy bowl. If you're not strapped for cash, go for the popular *feijoada* stew, black beans cooked slowly with "six types of pork and two kinds of beef," offered Saturday and Sunday. If you don't have the dough, have what most of Brazil eats every day: the "PF," prato feito ("ready plate"). It's beef, chicken, or fish with rice and Brazilian beans. End with the cheapest dessert, the wicked brigadeiro. Open seven days. In-, — E.B.

The French Gourmet 960 Turquoise Street, Pacific Beach, 858-488-1725. In the mood for pâté, ratatouille, or calf's liver in a homey atmosphere? Make a reservation at The French Gourmet tout de suite. Start off with traditionally prepared escargots or mussels. The onion soup is good, but hope that the soup du jour is gingered cream of carrot. Entrées include lamb loin, veal tenderloin, bouillabaisse, and fish, with several prepara-tion choices for chicken or filet mignon. The pan-roasted halibut is gently enhanced with a champagne beurre bland sauce and topped with crispy braised leeks. Desserts abound, with an imported French cheese plate topping the list — along with pastries, meringues, etc., all freshly prepared in-house. Bakery, breakfast, and lunch daily; no dinner Sunday or Monday. Moderate to expensive. — *S.M.*

Gringo's 4474 Mission Boulevard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-490-2877. With better cooking than you'd guess from its name, this ambitious spin-off of the local Moondoggies chain serves the sort of Mexican cuis you might find at a seaside resort in Cabo or Puerto Vallarta — skillfully prepared with good, fresh ingredients, just a bit dumbed-down in the flavors. The chile verde, say, is beautifully seasoned, if barely *picante*. Given the surefire location at the hub of PB party town, the food is actually better than it needs to be. A vast list of tequilas, interesting margaritas, and a sensible wine list emphasizing af-fordable, food-friendly Chilean bottlings add to the draw for a lively young crowd that revs the decibels to a roar on weekends. Three meals daily, brunch available Sunday. Moderate. — *N.W.*

The Mission Cafe and Coffee **House** 3795 Mission Boulevard (at San Jose Place), Mission Beach, 858-488-9060. Gourmet and Latino breakfasts served in funky surroundings. Outstanding are cinnamon French toast, blackberry-banana pancakes, and roast beef hash with rosemary potatoes and eggs. Chino-Latino lunch items. All dishes plus fabulous bread, scones, muffins, available for take-out. Open daily 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.W.*

The Surfside 4527 Mission Boulevard (at Garnet Avenue), Pacific Beach, 858-273-2979. In the evenings, it's a "scene" here — for good reason. You'll find fresh sushi, sashimi, and "California coastal cuisine," i.e., fun and flavorful fusion-y tapas, many of them going for half-price during weeknight happy hours. You can actually reserve for the sushi bar (it'll put you at the head of the line), where the chefs are unusually friendly. They shine on simple, pure Japanese sushi, although they make the usual "party rolls" too. Most seafood is of fine quality (except the *toro*, which seems to have problems). For those preferring a tapas-style sit-down meal, there's a breezy, informal dining room with large windows looking out on the street, plus a small private dining room for parties. At least four Japanese beers and more than a dozen sakes available. Reservations urged for large groups. Parking is tight; just one handicapped slot in front lot. Inexpensive to low moderate. — *N.W.*

Sushi Ota 4529 Mission Bay Drive (at Bunker Hill Street), Pacific Beach 858-270-5670. What becomes a legend most? At its best, this renowned sushi bar offers fish of exceptional quality, per-fect tart-sweet rice, tight wraps, and disciplined creativity. These joys don't come easily. First, find the place: Driving south from Balboa, look left, and pull into the mini-mall with the large 7-11 sign (opposite Rubio's). Sit at the sushi bar to snoop on your neighbors' choices, watching for off-menu extravaganzas. Don't miss the ama ebi with crisp shrimp heads, atypically flash-baked (not batter-fried). Cooked dishes are dull except for chawan mushi (custard broth with gingko nuts). Alas, when Ota-san's away, his elves may play — amateurishly. Best bet: Reserve a bar seat when the master's most likely to be present. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner daily. Disabled access chancy. Long, crowded waits unless you've reserved. Moderate. — N.W.

CENTRAL SAN DIEGO

La Fachada 20 25th Street (near Commercial Street), Logan Heights, 619-236-8566. The thing about La Fachada is: You can have anything any time. This restaurant near the trolley's 25th Street stop is Mexican but has Anglo food too — maybe because the cops' Central Division HQ sits across the road. Great not-quite-morning place for breakfast at, say, 3 a.m. They do a pretty good Western omelet breakfast with cheese, bell peppers, onions, and ham, bacon, or sausage. They also have great Caldo Siete Mares and Vuelva a la Vida, tasty soups laden with seafood. But the best fun is in the evening up to 11 p.m., when an outdoor kitchen operates, mostly serving tacos to eat under a big white garden canopy. Open 7 a.m. to 3 a.m. (Friday and Saturday open 24 hours). Inexpensive. — *E.B.*

Los Reyes 2496 Broadway (at 25th), Encanto, 619-231-0716. Smaller branch at 47th and Market. If you've ever craved those fabulous Mexican fish soups that can be such energy restorers, these strip-mall Mexican restaurants have a great one. It's Caldo 7 Mares (Seven Seas Soup and it comes as a big bowl of savory red fish soup clunking with giant crab legs clams, chunks of white fish, shrimp, the pink and purple suckers of octopus, and vegetables. It's also called *Vuelva a la vida:* "Return to life." On a hot day, their Cocktail Campechana (shrimp and oc topus in a light, spicy tomato broth) will return you to life, too. Four brothers and one sister from Michoacan run the place. A very Michoacan dish is *carnitas* — pork shoulders. Or try their gringo lunch deal of a bacon cheeseburger with fries and a can of soda. The prices make this a tightwad's paradise. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.*

Saigon 4455 El Cajon Boulevard, City Heights, 619-284-4215 or 619-284-4288. You're in a big glass palace here. It's especially good on Sundays, when threeor four-generation Vietnamese families gather for lunch. Gaggles of waiters hover a glance away, but take your time. The menu has over 250 items on it. Default choice: pho, the famous, filling soup-meal of Vietnam where beef cooks in the soup. Another safe bet is stir-fried crispy or soft egg noodle with seafood and assorted vegetables. "33" Viet-namese beer is on hand to make Saigon lovers sentimental. Open daily. Inex-

Trieu Chau Restaurant 4653 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-280-4204. This is as near as you'll come to eating breakfast in Phnom Penh or lunch in Vientiane. Cambodians come in the morning to talk politics and play Cambodian chess. At lunch, Laotians replace them. Maps of "Kam-puchea" decorate the walls, as well as long-distance telephone ads. The menu includes Chinese, Khmer, and Lao dishes. In the morning, ask for "djak kvai coffay dok ko" — fried bread with Cambodian coffee, the standard French-Khmer breakfast. Later in the day, you might try pan-fried noodles with broccoli and beef or shrimp and gravy ("koitiow bahat sai kho"). If in doubt, ask for Kathy, who speaks Chinese, Khmer, Lao — and English. Open daily, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.*

Turf Supper Club 1116 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-234-6363. At this cozy saloon (a landmark since 1950, "re-established" in 1998), if your meat's done wrong, it's your own fault. Every night's an indoor cook-out, as patrons huddle by the communal fire-pit tending their steaks (a choice of three ritzy cuts, well-marinated in garlic and olive oil), burgers, chicken breasts, or portobello mushrooms; others choose the veggie kabobs or teriyaki skewers of beef, chicken, or fish. And that's the menu. The only side dish is a simple salad — not even fries. But the meat's a treat, especially the huge, juicy Delmonico rib eye. If you're an ut-terly hopeless cook, a staffer will mind your meal for you, but you'd miss half the fun. Full bar, no reservations. Weekdays dinner only; open until 2 a.m. daily. Inexpensive to barely moderate. — N.W.

Barnes Bar-B-Que 2625 Lemon Grove Avenue, Lemon Grove, 619-462-9206. Clayton Davis's sign says it all: "Let Us Bring Tha South to Ya Mouth." You can tell this is the real deal from the two heavy iron doors in the brick wall behind the counter and

the big wood fires burning oak inside. This is Memphis-style soul food, mild and mouth watering — and cheap. Expect dollar portions, from smothered chicken or pork, neck bones and cabbage, to country yams, corn on the cob, and corn bread. Other lip-smacking dishes include chopped beef brisket sandwich, pork ribs or shoulder, beef ribs, red snapper, and hot links or ham - all with two sides and bread Oh yes, they also serve catfish sandwiches and sweet potato tarts. Or you could just stand outside and smell the smoke. Open Tuesday through Sunday, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. —

Jimmy's 9635 Mission Gorge Road (at Center Drive), Santee, 619-448-8994. We're at the end of the line here, the trolley's Orange Line. Feels like a safari. You walk back through the grass to the streets of Santee. Thank goodness for this family-friendly restaurant with good, old-fashioned American food. Their six-page plastic menu tells all - forget your diet and dig into the breakfast "Eggs and Cakes" (two eggs, three pancakes), the "Touchdown" (two eggs, two hotcakes, four strips of bacon or three link sausages), or the "Monte Cristo" hot sandwich (ham and turkey grilled on batter-dipped Texas toast with Swiss cheese, hot syrup, and French fries). Later in the day, the New York strip or sirloin steak with all the trimmings, and desserts like homemade cinnamon bread pudding with raisins and whipped cream. Open three meals, seven days. Inexpensive. — E B

Los Michoacanos 8001 Mission Gorge Road, Santee, 619-449-9032. You get a lot for a little here. Order even one really cheap potato taco from Luis Gabriel, the owner, and you get the full treatment of tortilla chips and salsa beforehand. Then out comes this hot, crisp-shelled taco, bursting with shredded lettuce, two cheeses, and inside, the most scrumptious sautéed potatoes. It may be way cheap, but it's no way mean. Other good Mexican dishes here include the chorizo torta or the grand garlic shrimp combo. Added bonus: The place is new, bright, red and yellow, and sports a terrace looking out across the valley. Open seven days, three meals. Inexpensive — E.B.

The Omelette Factory 7941 Mission Gorge Road, Santee, 619-596-9686. The Factory sits in the kind of standalone building you expect to see in a country town: long, angled roof with a portico dressing up the basic shed structure behind. It's a great sprawling place that's ideal to bring the kids for a big breakfast You can't beat their omelets. all nineteen of them, from the Just Say Cheese (with Swiss, Jack, Cheddar, or American), to the magnificent Factory Omelette (a build-your-own: up to four meats, veggies, or cheeses). A Greek familv has turned this location, outside Santee, from an abandoned social hall into a regular pit stop for half the community, it seems. For lunch, try the Factory Burger. It has two hamburger patties plus gyro meat, two cheeses, and onions. Breakfast and lunch, seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B.

FAR EAST

La Posta 32337 Old Highway 80, Pine Valley, 619-478-5600. Is the Wild West dead? Not out here. Swagger in past the rocking chairs on the wooden porch, by the "NRA meets here, every 3rd Wednesday, 7 p.m." sign, past bows and arrows, dream catchers, lariats, and brass spittoons, and swing into a chair. Now think vintage American food. Hefty anytimebreakfasts include two eggs, hash browns, biscuits, and coffee or eggs with chicken-fried steak or a bulging veggie omelet. ("With syrup" breakfast items, such as pancakes, stop at 2:30 p.m.) Their sourdough cheeseburger with fries or potato salad is big, or delve into a bowl of chili. Folks hereabouts talk about that chili in low, reverent voices. For dinnerthe rib eye steak or pork chops is good enough to make city folks swoon. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Ramon's Smokehouse BBQ 1730 Alpine Boulevard, Suite 110, Alpine, 619-445-1008. The smell of mesquite vood burning under fresh-cut beef rib is beyond resistance. The secret Texas recipe draws crowds. Go Sunday morning, especially, when chefs in maroon ons dance around the fat-spitting fire, disappearing into the clouds of fragrant

smoke to flip the racks of beef and pork ribs. In good weather you can eat out back next to an authentic chuck wagon. Inexpensive. — E.B.

UPTOWN & OLD TOWN

Adams Avenue Grill 2201 Adams University Heights, 619-298-8440. The frequently changing menu tries to embrace several disparate styles and can't quite get its arms around any of them. The dishes are often ambitious; a few soar, but many falter due to flaws in conception, execution, or both. Largely ho-hum wine list needs selec-tions with enough sweetness to stand up to items featuring Asian spice — try the Rieslings. Still, the place seems full of happiness and friendliness: yellow and orange walls, plenty of smiles amid the bustle. Soups receive lavish attention and sometimes live up to their billings. As to treats, the generous, marvelous laven-der-infused crème brûlée makes this a dessert destination — pause to sniff a spoonful before slipping it between your lips. Lunch and dinner daily, breakfast Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — A.M.

Cafe on Park 3831 Park Boulevard (at University), Hillcrest, 619-293-7275. Okay, it's trendy, from the rusty spoon and-fork sign at the door to the PC industrial interior (concrete walls, exposed plumbing). But don't expect PC food. The plates are huge and overflowing with fodder. Breakfast scrambles are popular with add-ons such as smoked salmon artichoke hearts, or Brie cheese. Health nuts choose the Park Porridge stuffed with apples, raisins, and honey. But the prize may be the dish that Placerville, California, miners ordered when they came down from the mountains with pockets full of gold: the Hangtown Fry luscious marinated sautéed oysters scrambled in eggs. Three meals Tuesday through Saturday; only breakfast and lunch Sunday and Monday (line at door on Sunday). — E.B.

Golden Dragon, The Asian Bistro

414 University Avenue (just east of Fourth), Hillcrest, 619-296-4119. The historic building has been freshly redecorated, keeping only the overhead sign that used to mark a one-time Chinese "dive." Now the eclectic pan-Asian menu emphasizes Thai flavors - the owners and kitchen staff are Thai, including executive chef "Miss Songsri" (who put Celadon on the map), working in a more casual vein here. Don't miss "Atomic Hog's Wings" (small pork shanks) or the Louisiana fried buster crab dish named "Jumping Jarvis." The beer and wine lists are international and affordable. Lunch and dinner, serving until 3 a.m. nightly. Lunches inexpensive, dinners moderate. — N.W.

Ichiban 1449 University Avenue (at Normal), Hillcrest, 619-299-7203. Is this Paris or Tokyo? At night, the café outside glows like a Van Gogh painting, except the customers are eating sushi and drink-ing green tea, not red wine. The best val-ues are at lunch, with weekday specials like Bento combos (sushi rolls, crab, salmon, rice) and filling soups overflowing with veggies and thick *udon* noodles. Healthy? You betcha. The miso soup (with every dish) made from soy and seaweed is a great daily iodine fix. Number One — that's what "ichi-ban" means. Open daily until 9:30 p.m., lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Jack and Giulio's Italian Restaurant 2391 San Diego Avenue (at Arista). Old Town, 619-294-2074. After more than four decades in business, this father (Giulio) and son (Jack) operation manages to stay fresh. The antipasto salad, with its thin-cut prosciutto and salami, will get your juices flowing. All the traditional Italian entrées like veal parmigiana and fettuccine Alfredo are there, but go for the house specialties like Spaghetti New Orleans with shrimp, crawfish, and crab meat, or the expensive scampi dishes, Broke? Get a simple Angel Hair Mediterraneo or rigatoni with meat sauce to enjoy out on the patio. Open for lunch and dinner, seven days. Moderate. — *E.B.*

Sushi Itto 441 Washington, Hillcrest, 619-291-6060. Don't come here looking for Japanese food. This is Mexican sushi. from a chain based in Mexico City that's dedicated to creating rolls for Mexican tastes. Nearly all the party rolls feature cream cheese and avocado and most in-

clude a shot of hot spice and some fake crab (surimi), too. In their own way, they're fun, so long as you're prepared to give up any puristic standards and go with the flow. But don't bother with the plain *nigiri*— the rice lacks classic sushi seasonings (and is often dry), and the seafood is too mediocre to be appealing in simple preparations. Rock-bottom prices, though. Another branch is in the Gaslamp at 409 F Street, 619-237-1037. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — N.W.

DOWNTOWN

Athens Market 109 West F Street and First (between First and Front), 619-234-1955. Alex Spanos and lots of local hotshots come here for honest Greek home cookin'. Yes, it's classy white table cloths, linen napkins you can fill up on just a bowl of fakee, owner Mary Pappas's "secret recipe" lentil soup, and an appetizer, like spanakopita (spinach and cheese pastry pockets). Entrées come with rice, roast potato, a vegetable, soup or salad, and French bread and butter - all at a darned good price. Oh, and don't despise the gyro. Meat flavor's great, and it takes a football player to empty this plate. Lunch and dinner Monday through Friday, dinner only Saturday, closed Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

Bud's Louisiana Food Shoppe 2034 Kettner Boulevard (at Grape, next to the Waterfront Bar), Little Italy, 619-239-4210. Bud Deslattes, a New Orleans native, was the original chef-owner of the late Bayou Bar and Grille and the inventor of the legendary white choco-late bread pudding served there. Now he's cooking it in this cute, casual eatery. A brief but choice menu features authentic Cajun-Creole specialties, to eat in or "to geaux." (If taking out, ask for your rice on the side.) Among the treats are a fine seafood bisque, crawfish étouffée, and a "cupa-cupa" sampling of gumbo, jambalaya, and red beans and rice. For lunch, check out the roast beef po' boy. Some Louisiana grocery items intermittently available at retail (frozen andouille, tasso, crawfish, etc.). Parking's usually a pain but worth it. Beer and generic wine. Closed Sunday and Monday. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Cabo Cafe & Grill 808 West Cedar (near Pacific Coast Highway), Little Italy, 619-595-1618. This miracle restaurant is run by homeless kids from the Monarch School Project next door, with a little help (okay, a lot) from Rubio's and its founder Ralph. He helped raise a million dollars to get the school and the

restaurant running. Think Starbucks meets Taco Bell (oops, sorry Ralph). The place is like its kid-staff: smart, cheery (they painted all the seals and porpoise murals), with a great fountain-gurgling patio outside. Try the grilled burrito grilled chicken or steak with guacamole, roasted salsa, sour cream, black beans Mexican rice, and melted Jack cheese in a warm tortilla) or, as a great filler, the Cabo Maestro Bowl, with marinated grilled chicken or steak in a bowl with black beans, Mexican rice, cheeses, gua-camole, and shredded cabbage. And yes, they do make the Rubio fish taco. Daily specials. Open weekdays, 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Edgewater Grill 861 West Harbon Drive, Seaport Village, 619-232-7581. An easy walk from the Convention Center, the dining room is spacious and handsome, and the view from the crowded dining terrace is optimal (the bay, the Coronado Bridge, a park, etc.). The menu, though, is convention-centered—like a Howard Johnson's for the 21st century. The fare features middleof-the-road faux-fusion salads, seafood, grilled steaks, pastas (most with shell-fish), and individual pizzas, plus daily fin-fish dishes listed on a card in a plastic holder on the table. The lighter dishes are the most successful - this is not a bad place to "graze" on appetizers and a mini-pizza when you're starved for a view. Difficult wheelchair access to terrace. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Entrées high moderate to very expensive. — N.W.

Fat City Steakhouse 2137 Pacific Highway (at Hawthorn), Little Italy, 619-232-9303. In the Deco "pink palace" at the edge of downtown, the USDA Choice steaks (and one velvety Prime cut) are cooked over mesquite charcoal which lends them a deliciously smoky campfire flavor. Don't like beef? You can choose nicely grilled chicken, pork, or salmon; two vegan pastas; or scampi. The appetizer list is mainly trite pub grub,

but the fry cook does a great job with calamari. And in fair weather, the lush garden dining patio is a little piece of Eden. Full bar, rather basic wine list. Casual ambience, above-average wheelchair access from large, free parking lot. Dinner daily 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *N.W.*

Las Cuatro Milpas 1857 Logan Avenue, Barrio Logan, 619-234-4460. This isn't a restaurant, it's a legend. The same Estudillo family has been serving oldfashioned Mexican food here for three generations — seventy years. Rice, beans, pork tacos (they don't serve beef), pork tamales, chorizo with eggs — that's about it. So how come they have lines outside every day? Blame a potent mix ture of sentiment and the lard they refuse to abandon. Folks say that lard flavor is the real Mexico. Also famous: their Saturday *menudo*. Warning: go easy with their deep wine-colored hot sauce. It's room-rocker strength. The name? From a famous mariachi song, "The Four Cornfields." Open morning to mid-af-ternoon, Monday to Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Mediterranean Cafe and Lounge

1352 Fifth Avenue (between A and Ash), downtown, 619-515-2233 or 619-325-1900. Don't come early. You'll be all alone. Turn up around midnight, and you'll see just how social the Lebanese can be. Meals are spread over a couple of hours with lots of conversation, probably finishing with a baklava Turkish coffee, and a sheesha - water pipe (much cheaper by the hour here than down in the Gaslamp; best flavor rose). They have the whole panoply of Middle Eastern and Greek food, but the best deals are probably the single lamb skewer on a roll of pita bread with hummus, tomato, lettuce, and pickles, or the meat pie on pita. Open 5:30 p.m. to 3 a.m., seven days. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

Ocean Room and Lounge 630 Fifth Avenue (north of Market), Gaslamp 619-501-6550. Sometimes you don't want a temple of haute cuisine, merely an easygoing place for folks to meet especially if there are oysters involved Ocean Room fills that bill handily, one of the few Gaslamp joints where you can enjoy a conversation without straining over the noise. The fare is mainly Mediterranean-style seafood, with a few nods at Caiun cuisine Pleasant dishes include mussels mariniere, "Cajun' seafood pasta (with sub-Cajun spice levels), seafood pan roast, and Fanny Bay oysters on the half-shell. Or try the oyster shooters. Valet parking, bar for single diners, casual feel. Dinner nightly Expensive (but less than average for the neighborhood). - N.W.

Pete's Quality Meats 1742-1/2 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-1684. Pete's Meats was just a butcher's shop until Pete's daughter and sister-in-law got the idea to set up a grill there. Now aficionados line up for Sicilian specialties like Italian-sausage sandwiches, steak sandwiches, and especially spitini - veal rolled around two cheeses, onions, tomatoes, pine nuts, currants, parsley, prosciutto, and bread crumbs. Pete stuffs all of that into a hot bun with marinara sauce, sautéed peppers, and onions as packing. Nuff said? Inexpensive. — *E.B.*

Sevilla 555 Fourth Avenue (at Market Street), Gaslamp, 619-233-5979. This site has three faces: a crowded but civilized tapas bar for spontaneous snacking, a romantic dining room with serious Spanish entrées, and a basement nightclub dishing out assembly-line paella. The best food is upstairs. You can get tapas in the restaurant and entrées at the bar, and in either case the choices are varied, interesting, and highly cos-mopolitan, executed with wonderful consistency. Be sure to look for some thing that includes potatoes; the humble spud gets Cinderella treatment here. No reservations (or wheelchairs) at tapas $bar; reservations\, strongly\, recommended$ for dining room. Dinner daily. Moderate. — N.W.

SOUTH BAY & CORONADO

Coronado Boathouse 1887 1701 Strand Way, Coronado, 619-435-0155. For a relaxing good time with lovely views and tasty food to match, put on your aloha shirt and head over the bridge. The old Coronado Boathouse boasts a handsome, historic structure with architecture mirroring the nearby Hotel Del, plus enthusiastic servers, terrific water views, and satisfying mainstream American cooking. The herbed artichoke appetizer and fresh macadamia-crusted halibut sauced with coconut milk are wonderful. The juicy roast beef here is USDA Prime (translates to "melt in your mouth") and even the desserts offer some old fa-

Da Kine's Plate Lunches 1635 Sweetwater Road (at Prospect), National City, 619-477-8494. You go here for your Pacific Island fix - hundreds of Hawaiians do, every day. You'll find Hawaiian license plates and surfboards on the walls, "Aloha Maid" Guava Nectar, and island food. Although the kalua pig here isn't cooked in an imu hole in the ground — it sure tastes like the real thing and comes with cabbage, rice, macaroni salad, and kimchi. But beware of the *haupia* cake — it may cause serious addiction. Lunch and early dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Island Wok 922 Orange Avenue,

Coronado, 619-435-6835. This tiny indoor-outdoor-takeaway café is a standby with locals, especially the high school crowd. It serves good Vietnamese-Chinese food, and plenty of it. The owner, Xuan, makes scrumptious fresh (not fried) Vietnamese spring rolls wrapped in rice paper with shrimp, pork, or chicken and vegeta-bles in the middle. But most customers go for the steam-table combination plates. You always get chow mein, fried or steamed rice, and a fried spring roll to start off, and then you can add entrées like orange chicken, kung pao chicken, or sweet-and-sour pork. Lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday. Closed Sunday. Inexpensive.

Parisi's Italian Restaurant 323 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-420-4490. This is an area where a lot of folks live in trailer parks on fixed incomes, and Parisi's has become their affordable, often daily treat. The good news is they don't just open cans. Nick and Rosemary Parisi, who opened here back in 1979, brought New Jersey traditions with them. Nick had been a butcher. His son Nick still makes his own delicious fennel-flavored sausage just as his dad taught him. Sons and daughters now run the place and still make their own spaghetti sauce, too. Other dishes include the eggplant or veal Parmesan sandwich and meatballs and sauce with garlic bread. This isn't the smart, spare Gaslamp Italian, it's the old-fashioned Moonstruck Italian. Lunch and dinner — E.B.

Peohe's The Landing, 1201 First Street, Coronado, 619-437-4474. This gorgeous, view-endowed restaurant offers upscale, Hawaiian-inspired fish and gargantuan steaks in a plush tropical-style setting with indoor waterfalls and three separate patios. Given the visual splendor, much of the food is better than it needs to be, featuring topquality seafood prepared with care, e.g. halibut in a lush, sassy Frangelicotouched macadamia beurre blanc. A chocolate shell filled with macadamia nut ice cream may be worth the calories, too. Full bar. Reservations advised. Lunch (with limited breakfast) Monday through Saturday; brunch Sunday. Dinner nightly. Expensive. — N.W.

From the United States use the prefix 011-52-664 when calling Tijuana; when calling in Tijuana use only the restaurant's seven-digit number.

Manzanilla Riveroll 122 (off Lopez Mateo), Ensenada, Baja Mexico, 646-175-7073. At this art-filled, very "Euro" bistro, a pair of gifted, classically trained chef-owners are pioneering "new Mexican cuisine," creating sophisticated combinations of superb local products and traditional Mexican flavors. Fresh-caught seafood, local-grown vegetables and mesquite smoke from the wood-burning grill are fea-tured players on the seasonal menus; a spectacular rib-eye steak, tender and intensely beefy, is also a constant. Little wonder this has become the destination restaurant south of Tijuana. The menu is in Spanish, but owners Benito Molina and Solange Muris Evans speak fluent English, as do some wait staff. (The only communication problem will be the exotic music blasting on the sound system.) Reserve for weekends especially during tourist seasons. Full bar featuring tequilas, Baja vintners. Wednesday through Saturday, late lunch through dinner, until midnight. Moderate. — N.W.

Original Ortega's In Puerto Nuevo next to Casa de la Langosta, on the first street to your left (Calle Principal) af-ter entering town through the entry gate. Open since 1952, this is the original "Lobster Village" restaurant, and not much has changed. Eventually Ortega's grew into an octopus with multiple arms in Puerto Nuevo and Rosarito Beach, all pretty similar. The menu is longer than most, with numerous starters (including a tasty ceviche and an excellent tortilla soup), varied seafood entrées and *antojitos*, desserts, and even fancy coffees (including "Viagra," which features reputedly aphrodisiac Damiana herbal liqueur). The spiny lobsters (once local but now from who-knows-where) are first fried in lard, then finished off on the grill, and served with a greasy-tasting melted "Kitchen Maid" margarine blend, frijoles, rice, tortillas, and salsa. Full bar, English menu, staff marginally bilingual. Moderate to high, but with lowmoderate specials. No reservations, cash only. - N.W.

Bully's East 2401 Camino del Rio South, Mission Valley, 619-291-2665. Also at 5755 La Jolla Boulevard, La Jolla (858-459-2768), and 1404 Camino del Mar, Del Mar (858-755-1660). Despite the plasma TV sports screen, this place is very sixties. For example, dark, woody, plush red booths. And always crowded. Word is, they serve more prime rib with au jus and horseradish than any eatery in San Diego. The "Petite Cut" 8 ounce, their smallest, fills you plenty, with its baked potato and salad. But just once, come here with your main squeeze and order up the "full cut for two." It hangs ten over the edges. Or go bonkers and order the 32-ounce cut (available in Mission Valley) — just to watch your neighbors' eyes bug out. Not flush? Try the "Bully Burger," French Dip sandwich, or calamari sandwich. Lonely? Go to the horseshoe-shaped Low Bar. Lunch and dinner daily. — *E.B.*

Cilantro Live! 315-1/2 3rd Avenue, Chula Vista, 619-827-7401. (Newest opening at 3807 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-325-1949. Also at 7822 Broadway Avenue, Lemon Grove, 619-433-0678; and 300 Carlsbad Village Drive, Carlsbad, 760-585-0136.) Look in Cristina Guzmán's kitchen: no ovens, no burners. Only warmers, Her theory? Never heat food above 112 degrees or the enzymes will die. Enzymes? They're life. They give you energy and do your digestion for you. What's amazing is how much real-looking and -tasting food she can create with raw nuts and twigs. And fruit. And especially seeds. She creates tuna wraps using sunflower-pumpkin seed pâté and burgers using flax seeds — both pretty credible and edible. Drinks? The margaritas (green apple with ginger, lime, and cinnamon) have to be good: Ms. Guzmán comes from Mexico City. Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Lunch and dinner daily at Hillcrest branch. Inexpensive.

Popeye's Chicken & Biscuits 2333 Highland Avenue (at 24th Street), National City, 619-477-5605; 2210 E. Plaza Boulevard (at Euclid Avenue), National City, 619-470-3002; 3489 Santo Road (at Aero Drive), 858-573-0035; Metropolitan Center 1737 Euclid Avenue (north of Federal Boulevard), Chollas Creek, 619-527-6565; and 6095 El Cajon Boulevard (at College Avenue), 619-286-3322. This is the one major national chain to cling firmly to a regional American identity: Wherever you go, if you find a Popeye's, you'll be eating Louisiana flavors. But some flavors travel better than others in fastfood translations: The spicy, crisp fried chicken and air-light drop biscuits are fine as can be. The étouffé (whether of chicken or crawfish, when available) is surprisingly decent. The gumbo, offered at some locations, is weird - flavors aren't bad, but it's more like a Creole risotto, with wet rice instead of liquid (where's the soup?). Dirty rice and jambalaya are nasty and dry. Food quality varies subtly from branch to branch, as does the attitude of the counter-persons. Open daily, three meals. Inexpensive. - N.W.

Ruby's Diner 1 Pierview Way, Oceanside, 760-433-7829. One thing about Ruby's: You can build an ap petite just getting there. It's at the end of the 1/3 mile-long Oceanside pier. (There's a \$1 shuttle tram, too.) Ruby's is part of a themed "forties diner" chain stretching from LAX to Scottsdale, Arizona. But it's still fun. Shiny Chevy Corvette-style red leatherette and chrome booths, white walls, port-holes, old Coca-Cola signs, "Dewey-Warren" presidential buttons, and that view to Hawaii. Good-sized servings, too - try their omelets. Also in Carlsbad and Mission Valley. Open daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Uno Chicago Bar and Grill The 1943-born Uno chain made its mark by transforming the flat Italian pizza into something a little more upstanding. Deep-dish pizzas have become one of Chicago's better-known exports. Now Uno does serious steak too, with variously sized Angus top sirloins. They come pretty much as is, but the meat itself is plenty flavorful and ten-der. Its expanded menu includes fajitas, ribs, shrimp scampi, and steak'n cheese burgers. Still, most lunchtime customers we saw seemed to stick to the staple: deep-dish pizzas and salads. Open daily, continuous service, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate. 4465 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-483-4143; Fashion Valley Center, 619-298-1866; 5th and H, Chula Vista, 619-420-8660; 890 W. ver the prolific decade since Billy Madison, Adam Sandler has posited himself as the voice of the blue-collar Joe, turning out lowbrow slapstick comedies that feed off hyper-masculine rage and im-

maturity but always come around to a sticky, sentimental message. Sandler knows his audience

well, so it's reasonable to say that his new comedy, I Now Pronounce You Chuck and Larry, serves as a solid bellwether for how a vast swath of straight Americans feel about gay people. There are two ways to look at it: Either be depressed that the culture hasn't evolved past its crude stereotypes and gay-panic jokes, or be encouraged by signs that the masses are slowly inching toward tolerance. Whatever the case, the film's desire to simultaneously mock and embrace makes it the most schizophrenic comedv of its kind since Shallow Hal, which chased fat jokes with an earnest message about how real beauty comes from within. Good intentions can only carry these films so far, and this one falls woefully short.

Why do Adam Sandler and Kevin James, best friends and partners in the New York City fire department, wind

up in a domestic partnership? Because James, a widower, wants pension benefits for his two children.

Sandler goes along with the scheme because James saved his life, but the film makes it clear that he's as far from gay as a strapping fireman can be. (He's so not gay, in fact, that he's currently sleeping with a set of twins, half of the Hooters waitstaff, and a doctor who looks as if she was lifted from Van Halen's "Hot for Teacher" video.) When the city challenges the partnership, the two face possible fraud charges, but their decision to hire gorgeous lawyer Jessica Biel leads to romantic complications.

Chuck and Larry works overtime to be an equal-opportunity offender, presenting flaming queers as funny





(and super-straight men being mistaken for gay as even funnier) but also mocking homophobic anxieties over soap-dropping in the shower or leaving child care to two daddies. The usual grade-school-level Sandler comedy doesn't help — director Dennis Dugan also helmed *Happy*

Gilmore and Big Daddy, so he maintains the low standards — but the film's earnest message constantly forces it to squirm out of offensive situations. At a certain point, the filmmakers just give up and give the floor to courtroom speechifying the likes of which haven't been seen since

Steven Seagal in *On Deadly Ground. Chuck and Larry* is one for the time capsule: If it doesn't look ridiculous now, try watching it again in a decade or three. Then it'll be funny for all the wrong reasons.

n a normal monster movie, the creature comes stalking the cast, creeping up and taking them out one by one. In Sunshine, the latest from Trainspotting director Danny Boyle and writer Alex Garland (Boyle's partner on The Beach and 28 Days Later), the cast comes stalking the creature, but it still has the upper hand at all times, and it has no problem picking them off: It's impossible to outthink or outfight the sun.

Cillian Murphy stars as the key member of "a collection of astronauts and scientists" on a mission to drop "a bomb with the mass of Manhattan Island" into the sun to rekindle its dying core. Murphy's multi-culti but otherwise generic spaceship crew (including Hiroyuki Sanada, Michelle Yeoh, and Fantastic Four's Chris Evans) is Earth's last hope, but a series of accidents, miscalculations, and twists diminish that hope to a thin

thread. In many ways, Sunshine is a been-there-done-that cast-attrition thriller: Alien with an exterior monster instead of an interior one, Event Horizon with better effects and less gore, Pitch Black with the contrast turned way up. The cast members make wry jokes about getting eliminated one at a time, horror-movie style, but they still follow all the horror-movie procedures, even duly splitting up in a dangerous, unknown situation. It's like they've gracefully accepted that they're just hitting a series of predestined, genre-mandated marks.

But Sunshine is still exceptionally intense. It must have been a hard sell; the first half is all hushed exposition and pseudo-science, and the initial crises involve a lengthy description about a 1.1-degree change in vector approach and lines like "I can't lower the mainframe panels!" On paper, it's a horror movie for dour physicists. But the paper version wouldn't hint at the aggressively showy visuals or the punishing sound effects and music, set at a volume fit to blow viewers back into their seats like the guy in the old Maxell cassette ad. Boyle overwhelms the screen with extreme close-ups of eyes, with light that hurts to look at, with lovely compositions in which the sun looms over Cillian's tiny ship like a Titan over a flea. All of Boyle's usual tricks — fast montages, subliminal frames, shaky-cam shots, sudden zooms - go into making Sunshine as unsettling and overwhelming as possible, to give the audience that sense of the vast, terrifying, implacable force hanging just outside the ship's hull. As narrative, Sunshine is exhausting and unsatisfying, with too many obvious plot flaws and too much about its crew and story left unexplored. But as a pure cinematic experience, it's exhilaratingly, brutally beautiful.




Matteo) urges her to just get out there, but all her dates - like a onenight stand with a vain actor (a very funny Justin Theroux) - end disas-

How Posey's neurotic, self-destructive heroine finds her way to healing is the core of this generous film, whose moral is that happiness can't begin unless you're open to its possibility. Captivity — Torture porn gets the glamour treatment in this American-Russian coproduction shot at Moscow's Mosfilm studios, with some location shots of New York thrown in as bookends. Elisha Cuthbert plays a cock-teasing celebrity model who's stalked and kidnapped by a strong, silent type in a hoodie, then subjected to such degradation and torture as being force-fed human organs and having to shoot her own bichon frise. Although clearly aping Saw, former art-house director Roland Joffé (The Killing Fields, The Mission) also cribs from Psycho and Panic Room. It's not scary because not one second is believable - starting with the idea of Cuthbert as a supermodel. With Daniel Gillies and Pruit Taylor Vince. — A.G.

Evan Almighty — In this farcical sequel to *Bruce Almighty* (2003), God is still a janitor played by Morgan Freeman, but the Buffalo newscaster played by Jim Carrey is now a Buffalo newscaster-turned-congressman played by The 40-Year-Old Virgin's Steve Carell. As soon as the hero arrives with his family in a Virginia suburb to "change the world," God orders him to build an ark and then sends loads of animals in pairs after him until he obeys. Freeman's God is a mix of Old and New Testament, with a dash of both sexism and sitcom; Carell's Noah is a political fool, but that only proves he's honest and sincere. This is idiotic, but it's so good-natured I did-

Back in the '80s, adaptations of King's fiction were the cutting edge in Hollywood horror; now, in the age of Saw and Hostel, they seem like old-fashioned comfort food, something for parents to enjoy while their kids are in the next theater digging the torture and evisceration. Mikael Hafstrom directed, and Samuel L. Jackson has a fine old time as the boogety-boogety hotel manager. — J.R.J.

Hairspray — Adam Shankman's movie version of the Broadway hit - itself based on John Waters's 1988 film — satirizes prejudice about race, class, and physical appearance in 1962 Baltimore. Plump, peppy teenager Tracy Turnblad (lovable newcomer Nikki Blonsky) crusades to integrate a local TV dance show and helps restore romance to the marriage of her eccentric dad (Christopher Walken) and







Unlike many teen comedies that are ripe with body humor but short on heart or intelligence, The Chumscrubber has humor, intelligence, and even heart. It includes a wonderful performance by Glenn Close. who plays a mother wrought by grief. The cast of characters includes a protagonist in high school who's taking too many prescription drugs and a character brought to life from video game hell.

As the tenth anniversary of Princess Diana's passing approaches, a good movie to watch on DVD that gives a fresh perspective on her life in relation to the monarchy is The Queen. Helen Mirren gives a very believable performance as a leader struggling with her inner beliefs and values. The movie makes excellent use of stock footage. Rescue Dawn — Released by MGM, starring two busy Hollywood actors, and easily slotted as a Vietnam POW adventure, this could be Werner Herzog's most commercial movie ever. But it's also elemental Herzog, a story of superhuman willpower that he first told in his moving 1997 documentary Little Dieter Needs to Fly. Christian Bale gives a committed performance as Dieter Dengler, the U.S. fighter pilot shot down over Laos in 1966 and held in a jungle camp; Steve Zahn and Jeremy Davies are compelling as Dengler's suffering prison mates, respectively drawn to and repelled by his irrepressible optimism as he plots their escape. With its clumsy treatment of the Laotian guards and its macho denouement back in the States, Rescue Dawn sometimes stumbles into Rambo territory (it was screened for U.S. troops in Iraq on Independence Day). But like much of Herzog's work, it's essentially apolitical, focusing on a man at war with his environment — and no one plunges into the foliage the

way he does. — J.R.J.

His blistering attack on the American health care system and the abuses of medical insurance companies offers eye-opening contrasts with national health services in Canada, England, and France, and, atypically, he delays appearing on-screen for some 40 minutes to keep the focus on this country's victims. When his comic persona finally does come in, there's something a bit irritating about him asking so many questions he already knows the answers to, sometimes paying more heed to the audience members he perceives as clueless than to the people he's talking to (as when he asks some Cubans on the street, "Is there a doctor here in Cuba?"). But this is still essential viewing - a moving, informative, corrosive, and even sometimes hilarious call to arms. — J.R.J.

La Vie en Rose — Marion Cotillard tears up all the available scenery in this overblown, achronological biopic of French pop singer Edith Piaf. Whether sincere or cynical, the movie is a near parody of the "Je ne regrette rien"/"This is Mrs. Norman Maine" school of female suffering and camp mortification: the heroine grows up in Grandma's brothel, sings on the streets, gets discovered by an entrepreneur (Gérard Depardieu no less), loses or gets snatched away from loved ones, becomes dependent on drink and drugs. Director-cowriter Olivier Dahan lamentably leapfrogs past most of the German occupation, when Piaf was a courageous member of the resistance. With Sylvie Testud and Emmanuelle Seigner. Vitus — Swiss director Fredi M. Murer, whose somber Alpine Fire (1985) featured a deaf boy incestuously stranded with his sister in the mountains, goes to the other extreme with this celebratory, familyfriendly fable about a child genius with super-sensitive hearing who finds himself all too immersed in the adult world. The 12-year-old Vitus (portrayed by piano prodigy Teo Gheorghiu), a prisoner of his wellmeaning parents' high expectations, can relax only during visits to his carpenter grandfather (a splendid turn by Bruno Ganz) as they tinker in the workshop and dream of flying. - Some parents feel "unprecedented levels of angst" to pick cool enough names for their kids, with some even hiring consultants, according to a June Wall Street Journal report. Baby-book authors charge clients \$50 for a list of "special" names, and half-hour phone consultations go for \$95. Another adviser charges \$350 for three calls plus a comprehensive linguistic history of the selected name, and one California mother paid \$475 to a numerologist to "test" the name Leah Marie for "positive associations." The Journal blames the problem on too much information about names (from the Internet), as well as parents' fear of dooming their child for life by insufficiently distinguishing their kid from others.

Cultural Diversity

- Violent demonstrations in northwestern India in May left at least 18 dead, as members of the lower Gujjar caste demanded that the government put them into an even lower class, at the bottom of the social ladder (so that they would be eligible for more government benefits). The Gujjars say that being one of the government's "Other Backwards Classes" is unsatisfactory and that they deserve worse.

— International restrictions on tuna fishing have created a shortage in Japan's sushi restaurants so dire that chefs are considering substitutes such as sushi prepared with raw horse or deer meat. While that would outrage many Japanese diners, some restaurateurs believe the plan feasible, according to a June New York Times dispatch from Tokyo. Said one: "We tasted it, and horse sushi was pretty good. It was soft, easy to bite off, had no smell.'

Latest Religious Messages

- Egypt's Muslims are growing weary of the number of specific religious edicts ("fatwas") issued by the country's clerics, including two recent, highly controversial ones, according to a June New York Times dispatch from Cairo. Ezzat Ativa, a lecturer at the prestigious al-Azhar Islamic University, had declared that men can be permitted to see unrelated women without their head scarves (which is ordinarily prohibited) by the symbolic act of the woman's breastfeeding the man five times, which in theory places the woman on similar footing to the man's mother. A second challenging fatwa declared that drinking the urine of the Prophet Muhammad would be holy. (Atiya has been suspended.)

- In May, one of the world's Christian "dental healers," the interdenominational Rev. Steve Jones, set up his latest revival tent, near Bradenton, Fla., and began not only allegedly curing toothaches but growing teeth and turning amalgam fillings into gold, according to the Sarasota Herald-Tribune. The reporter described a parade of witnesses claiming to have been healed and to have seen their crooked teeth straightened. Laying his hand on the jaw of one local resident, Jones assured the crowd, "You can see gold coming [into the filling].'

- Sandy Sabloff had been scheduled to receive a kidney from Australian Ashwyn Falkingham in April, at Toronto (Ontario) General Hospital, but the hospital canceled it at the last minute, apparently acceding to pressure from Falkingham's mother, who said her son had been brainwashed by a "cult" called Jesus Christians, which she said is obsessed with donating kidneys as a test of spiritual devotion. (Ashwyn Falkingham said he remained eager to donate.)

New Frontiers in Science

- (1) Hitachi's "brain machine interface," which it showed an Associated Press reporter in June, might soon allow a user to don a hat and turn an appliance on or off by merely thinking about

doing so. (Until now, such thought-controlled instructions could only be done by people with devices implanted.) (2) Scientists at Italy's La Sapienza University announced in May that they had, for apparently the first time, surgically grafted a vagina (built with stem cells) onto a woman who had been born without one due to a rare condition.

Questionable Judgments

 Probation-Happy Judges: (1) Judge Angelo DiCamillo of Camden, N.J., thought probation (and \$750 restitution) was enough for six teenagers in June, even though they had wrecked a family's home during a party (\$18,000 damages), urinated and defecated on the furniture and (except for one boy) declined to apologize. (2) Also in June, Judge Harold Kahn of San Francisco thought probation was enough for a woman who had claimed the identity of another (through stolen credit cards) and run up six months of bills and bad credit, and even though the thief was already on probation. (Bonus fact: The victim had collared the perp herself, following a chance meeting, and handed her to police.)



Me: "Okay. Thanks." Like I said, he was always helpful.

When I called him the night of the 59th Street



Bridge, he picked up the phone and we said "Hello?" to each other a few times until he finally realized it was me. Then he said, "Melissa? It's Allen!"

"Hi Allen. I knew it was you — *I* called *you*... How're you doing?"

He launched into the matter at hand and said, "I'm in Brooklyn. The five-nine is all screwed up. You can't get into Manhattan!"

"Traffic's bad, huh?"
"Terrible."

We talked for a few minutes and then Diego beeped in. A giant Puerto Rican guy in his 30s, Diego had somehow become my best friend at the garage.

"Yeah, I heard the bridge was bad. How's the airport?"

"It's all right. About half

full." He was referring to the capacity of LaGuardia's taxi hold lot, where all the cabs have to shut off their engines and wait for incoming passengers. He must've parked because I heard him go up to the coffee shop in the taxi lot and buy a pack of

cigarettes.

Then he said, "Yo, you coming back to work or what?"

"Yeah, soon. I'm starting to miss it a little."

Diego said, "Well, I miss *you*, buddy. I wanna see you soon."

When we hung up, Diego was still at the airport and, according to all reports, the 59th Street Bridge was still a mess.

Consistency, I'm learning, is a huge component of what we call sanity.

It is close to my son's 30th birthday. In most ways he is much younger than this, and in even more ways, he is older. Geoffrey is on disability. It sometimes seems as if the entire population of young men in California is receiving SSI or checks from the state, though usually, it seems, the money is for something like, "I, like, tweaked my back at work." In these cases, work amounts to a stint at construction just long enough to qualify for the aid or to build up a payable sum large enough to guarantee that the indignities of such work need not be suffered longer than a minimum percentage of the year. Geoffrey's disability, as some might know, is called schizophrenia, and it is its own fulltime but unprofitable job.

He has come a long distance in the past three years; a stranger might have an interaction, some kind of exchange with him for quite some time without assuming some mental illness or disorder is at play here. Both of those terms my son disallows and often objects to keenly.

I use the word "often" or "sometimes" or "depending on what day it is" when referring to him because his behavior, attitudes, beliefs, and state of health mentally or physically are anything but consistent. Consistency, I'm learning, is a huge component of what we call sanity. I will say that Geoff has become more consistent over three years rather than less. Some days I can see a time when he will be as eminently consistent, plodding, and predictable as the sanest of us. "Consistency is the hobgoblin of small minds," said Emerson. It is also the earmark, by a kind of cracker-barrel consensus, of the sane mind.

When I mention that Geoffrey does not like the terms "illness" or "disorder," it is usually during phases when he thinks of the affliction (another word he would not likely embrace) as "a gift." I encourage him. Why not? A positive outlook of any kind should be preferable, no? And in fact, the same mechanism (or broken mechanism) that seems to disable him so profoundly with an inability to focus or that sparks brief fits of paranoia (more and more a thing of the past) seems also to enable him with flashes of very clear, even brilliant, insight. Geoffrey's job is, essentially, to puzzle out the workings of his own mind, and this often leads him to examine the workings of others'.

He is embroiled in a kind of free-for-all philosophy/theology/psychology course with absolute relevance to his daily life. In fact, he studies like a madman (exactly like it), dipping into volumes on psychocybernetics and brain theory, meditation, The Essential Kabbalah and the Bible, fantasy and science fiction novels with the same democratic enthusiasm for 30 to 40 pages. Then, unsatisfied, or fired again with a new theoretical line of pursuit, he will immerse himself in mathematics, secret societies, numismatics, and often magick. This last is spelled with a k, as he does, to distinguish the subject from parlor illusions (which he also delights in performing, never quite successfully though all the while assuming he has). The stakes in these diversions are high. He pins too much hope on things as diverse and unlikely as the Way of Jedi Masters and the magic of Criss Angel and a dalliance with neurolinguistics.

Recently, we lived together for nine months with some difficulty and ultimate failure on my part when I went back to drinking out of frustration and heartbreak. This beautiful and intelligent kid had truly and forever slipped his moorings. He is irrevocably mad as a hatter. Even down to the ridiculous straw cowboy hat he wears and odd facial hair configurations ("It's kind of a Klingon thing, you like it?). When he meets people, his obesity and disingenuous comments, such as, "Do you believe in mind over matter?" are met with the look he has come to know all too well and usually precedes a comment from myself or his mother such as, "Have you been taking your meds?" He is puzzled and frustrated at this. After all, he has seen professional magicians open their acts with just such a question, why should he be looked at any differently?

He now wants to move in with me again after a year of being on his own, enjoying his autonomy and proving he can manage his bills and the minutiae of daily life. His apartment has now taken on "bad vibes" after some cruelty he experienced at the hands of some friends he had allowed into his home and his life for indefinite periods of time. Friends who would otherwise have been homeless. I don't know if this reunion is possible, as much as I worry about him alone. Until his insight into his condition evolves past denial, I have no idea what can reasonably be expected. When recently he began pacing in circles, his eyes focused off somewhere into the Kabbalah or the world of Star Wars, and he began again, as he did years ago, speaking to his hands, his explanation was, "It had



nothing to do with medication. I was just meditating too much and I hadn't been sleeping well." This to him is ironclad truth, based not in reason and so unswayable by reason.

In the meantime, I have no idea what to do. To do nothing for the moment seems best and is also necessary. Geoff at 30, me at 56, the looming possibility of my letting him down so completely again and going off the rails is untenable, but if it can be made to work...? Can a recurring nightmare be averted?

The nightmare: It is 2009 possibly, not too distant a future. It seems I am alive, having survived some hellacious alcoholic relapse, and I am living in an SRO (which could just as easily mean Standing Room Only as anything else) hotel room and sleeping beneath a single unshaded light bulb. I think there is a stuttering neon sign outside. I am drinking cheap vodka. My son is off somewhere: in some state institution until they dump him for insurance reasons or something, and he's probably out there on the streets tonight. I don't think they'd let him into St. Vinnie's; he probably couldn't get it together to show up every morning at 7 to hear if his name was called for a bed. Besides, once they saw how much he really needed a facility like theirs, he would be unofficially disqualified. You have to have some degree of manipulability, and Geoff would

No, he's probably on the streets, if he's still alive. Let's see, how long has it been since the eviction? Can't remember exactly but I'll start looking for him tomorrow, first thing. That's for sure. Yeah pretty sure, tomorrow.
