





**Blowback** A limousine operator in Washington, D.C., linked to the Randy"Duke"Cun-



**ningham** scandal is suing the Copley Press for libel, alleging that Union-Tribune business writer **Dean Calbreath** falsely reported that company limos "would pick up Congressman Duke Cunningham and a prostitute and take them to the ADCS hospitality suite." ADCS is the firm of Brent

Wilkes, the Poway defense contractor convicted of bribing Cunningham. The suit, filed in Washington's U.S. District Court by Shirlington Limousine and Transportation, Inc., and its owner Chris Baker, further claims that Calbreath also erred when he reported in April 2006 that the limo company had brought prostitutes to the ADCS suite. The action, filed last May and amended in October, claims that as a result of the allegedly false U-T coverage, Baker "suffered economic, commercial, emotional, psychological and political damage" and was subjected to "a brutal and scathing witch hunt characterized by highly invasive, unwarranted congressional, fed-

House of Representatives Committee on Homeland Security held a public hearing exclusively on SL&T, a member of Congress introduced a Congressional Resolution in the House of Representatives calling for an investigation of SL&T, Congresswoman Louise

M. Slaughter requested the

Department of Homeland Security to cancel SL&Ts multi-million dollar federal contract with DHS, hundreds of media stories were published nationally which repeated the false allegations, SL&Ts lease at Ronald Reagan Airport was terminated, and other business damages occurred."

Baker and his company are asking the court to award them at least \$50 million in damages. Copley's lawyers filed a motion in November to dismiss the complaint on the grounds that the Washington court has no jurisdiction over the California paper and its San Diego-based reporter. Judith Fanshaw, a San Diego-based attorney for Copley, said it was company policy not to discuss the merits of the case, but added, "If you look at the lawsuit and you look at the story, it just speaks for itself [in favor of dismissal]."

**Boxed in** If past behavior is any guide, last weekend's playoff game between the Chargers and the Tennessee Titans resulted in a full house at the City's Qualcomm Stadium box, to which each San Diego city council member receives two free tickets. (The mayor gets six; Councilman **Scott Peters**, the council's president, gets four; stadium management receives eight; City Attorney Mike Aguirre gets two; and two go to each of the nine members of the City's stadium advisory board.) After years of scandals — some involving tickets given by councilmembers to

their biggest campaign contributors — the City finally adopted a new procedure requiring the City boxgoers to affix their legible signatures to a roster that was supposed to be posted quarterly on the Internet for review by the curious citizenry. (As of last week, the sheets for the second and third quarter were missing from the clerk's website, requiring a trip downtown to the clerk's office; an assistant clerk said the omission should be corrected by now.)

At the September Bears game, stadium manager Erik Stover gave two tickets to the Fort Lauderdale, Florida-based Sport Management Research Institute, which describes itself as "a



full-service market research consulting firm specializing in sport and entertainment business." According to a September 13 memo, the gift represented a "trade-out of guest services research during Chargers games." Malissa Stanley, a local muralist, got two tick-

ets in exchange for a "logo

painting in the press box." Other recipients included Jeff Vetting of Live Nation Motor Sports, which runs motorcycle events at Qualcomm, and Steve Redfern of AEG Live, which is building that 13,000-seat outdoor concert venue located on the former Chargers' practice field. Others to bag the coveted box seats over the course of the football season included the son and mother of Councilman Jim Madaffer; Matt and Lindsey **McGrath**, listed as relatives of Aguirre lieutenant Don McGrath; and lobbyist and political consultant Art Castanares, who went with Councilman Ben Hueso.

## **Charity begins in Chula Vista**

Charger owner Alex Spanos, who has proclaimed Chula Vista the ultimate locale of his new football stadium — if it is to be built in San Diego County at all — has been putting a little of his money where his mouth is. According to a December 19 filing with the state's Fair Political Practices

Commission, the football team kicked in with a \$5000 donation to Casa Seguras, "a confidential shelter for women and children," at the behest of  $\textbf{Shirley Horton}, Chula \ Vista's$ GOP assemblywoman. Other big donors recruited by Horton for the same cause included EastLake Company (\$25,000);



Union Bank of California (\$10,000); and Annie and David Malcolm (\$10,000). Back in 2003, David Malcolm, a former port commissioner, pleaded guilty to one felony count of conflict of interest regarding a secret contract he had arranged to pull strings on behalf of Duke Energy - operator of the port-owned South Bay Power Plant that Spanos now has in his sights as the location of the proposed stadium.

# Raid!

here is an old Wall Street adage that is apt for both 2008 and 2009: "When they raid the whorehouse, they take the

charwoman and piano player too." Translation: when the stock market panics, it doesn't have time to distinguish between the naughty and the nice, between the innocent and not-so-innocent. They are all piled into the paddy wagon and hauled off to the pokey. It's like that with stocks of big financial institutions in today's mortgage crisis. Nobody knows what the mortgage-related paper these banks hold is worth. So the market knocks almost all of these stocks down mercilessly.

This causes a lot of unhappiness but also brings opportunity. At some point, somebody will recognize that the market has been punishing the charwoman and the piano player, who aren't burdened with much lousy mortgage paper. Their stocks will rebound, while the stocks of

This year and next, there is a perfect market and economic environment for betting on charwomen and piano players, although this

U.S. economy will provide that in spades. There is a 35 to 60 percent chance of a national recession, caused by the mortgage and real estate crisis and the damage it is doing to consumer spending, which is 70 percent of the economy. (San Diego's recession odds are about 80 percent; it may already be in recession, because the real estate chaos will be more intense than in the rest of the nation.) Recession or not, there is agreement that the U.S. economy will soften



can be a speculative game. The stock market will be highly volatile, as it was in 2007. Categories of stocks will be in favor one day and out of favor the next. That means more raids and more eventual exculpation of the innocent.

Such market volatility feeds on uncertainty, and the

# **Innocents Saved** from the Trash

en years ago, Elissa Davey received her vocation. She was a 50-year-old realtor, mother of two sons, and resident of San

Marcos when the call came in the form of a story in the newspaper about a newborn baby found dead and abandoned in Chula Vista. "Usu-



ally," she says today, "you read stories like that and say, 'Oh my God, who could do something like that? How cruel.

How ignorant. How sad.' Then your day starts, and you are off on your own and you forget."

But Davey couldn't forget that baby. "I don't know why that particular baby was different, but it haunted me to the point where, after a month, I called the County Medical Examiner's Office and I asked them what became of that baby. And he said he was still there. And if nobody claimed him, he would go into an unmarked grave at Mount Hope Cemetery. I asked, 'How do you claim a baby that is not yours?' He said, 'Show me you have a dignified place to put him.' So I went to work to make a dignified place to put him. But I didn't get that baby, because it took me almost a year to get it all set up."

What she set up was a nonprofit organization called



Garden of Innocence, dedicated to burying unidentified dead babies such as the Chula Vista baby she had read about and babies abandoned at local hospitals. El Camino Memorial park in Sorrento Valley "offered to donate 105 places for me. I just had to pay a one-time fee of \$16,000 for the opening and the closing of the graves."

Davey had put together

a board of directors for the nonprofit. She gathered them all and showed them the offer from El Camino. "I put the note on the table, and everyone that was there said, 'I am not signing that note.' Nobody would sign it with me. So I figured, 'I will sign, I don't care.' So I signed it, and I owed \$16,000 to El Camino."

She borrowed \$16,000 against the equity in her house to pay the cemetery and paid it off over the next two and a half years with fund-raising efforts. "I started doing public speaking, I started putting out the word and getting people involved. We did a fund-raiser, and then New Venture Church in North County donated \$10,000, and another donor gave us \$15,000. So I was able to pay that off. Then, over the next couple of years, I decided to buy the land

around the garden. It came to \$30,000, but it was enough gravesites for 600 children. So I decided to do more public speaking and try to meet 30,000 people and ask them for a dollar each. I didn't have to meet 30,000 people, but I had to meet a lot of them. I spoke at church groups and civic groups, Lions Clubs, Kiwanis. I spoke at youth groups — some of the youth groups raised money by having car washes. We only put on one big fund-raiser. I was able to pay [the \$30,000] in a year and a half. So now the garden is totally paid off, except every time we bury a baby, we have to pay a fee of \$125."

In the spring of 1999, a baby boy whom Garden of Innocence members would later name Adam "was found wrapped up in his mother's sweatpants and thrown in the trash," Davey recalls.

The county medical examiner turned over Adam's body to Davey. On May 21, 1999, Adam became the first baby buried at the Garden of Innocence. And he was almost the last. "The medical examiner told us that part of the & rules were, if [a baby] is Dunidentified and considered & certified abandoned, that we continued on page 10

And that's where the uncertainty lies. The dollar has plunged 30 percent against other currencies. The countries behind those currencies, particularly the euro, aren't happy about this dollar weakness. Those countries' export businesses are hurting. They would like to see the euro weaken against the buck.

But the U.S. Federal Reserve is fighting a recession. The usual cure is liquidity. Lending is frozen by the mortgage crisis. A little monetary juice may loosen things up. The Fed is expected to lower interest rates and, through its daily open-market operations, pump liquidity through the banking system.

Problem: more liquidity weakens the currency even more because lower interest

rates make dollar-denominated assets less attractive. A weaker currency and a flood of liquidity lead to even more inflation. For example, the weaker dollar leads to higher prices of imports. When import prices rise, domestic producers have an excuse to raise their prices.

So we have monetary inflation — the kind that is created by central banks, in effect, printing money. But we also have nonmonetary inflation. Food prices, in particular, are going up for other reasons. Until a couple of years ago, food prices were going down. No more. Globally, wheat prices have doubled since spring. Other agriculture commodities' prices have been soaring. "Dearer food is likely to persist for years," says the Economist magazine, which labels the phenomenon "agflation."

Among the many factors tipping the supply/demand balance toward higher prices: the amount of meat a Chinese person eats each year is now 150 percent higher than it was in 1985. America's subsidization of ethanol will use up one-third of the corn crop. Result: higher corn prices. And fuel inflation will probably remain high.

Consumer inflation is now running at 4 to 5 per-

cent and may be at 6 percent or higher by year-end. This is beyond the Fed's tolerance limits and will inhibit its ability to fight recession with lower interest rates and more monetary juice. The Fed will look for creative, low-key ways to pump liquidity into the banking system. Other countries will do the same to lower their currencies, as they are doing now. The world's central banks will say these are coordinated efforts to melt frozen global credit markets, but that may not be what's going on: nations may be trying to whack their own currencies — something similar to competitive devaluations.

Just imagine the volatility. Today, analysts are sure that because of the weak dollar, the stocks to buy are the ones that sell products overseas: Caterpillar, General Electric, Boeing, Coca-Cola, etc. Those stocks will probably rise in this environment. Then suppose the dollar starts rising. Raid! These stocks will be hauled off to the

One day, certain stocks will be in jail, and the next, in favor. The overall market could crash this year, or it could go up, at least moderately. It is not as tied to the economy as it once was, because fiscal and monetary policies are obsessively devoted to keeping stocks up. Even though earnings may crater, the market could continue to be buoyed by liquidity. Just watch out if the Fed can no longer pump in the juice and interest rates soar with inflation. Bonds will fall in price. The only place to hide will be money market funds, savings instruments, and commodities (but be wary of those shark-filled commodity pits).

Since the government is holding a gun to your head and telling you to buy stocks, you really should own some. One way to hedge is to buy stocks of recession-proof companies making consumer essentials that also have a big overseas presence. There are two jewels: Procter & Gamble and Johnson & Johnson. Since the tax on dividends is now so low, you can load up on utilities, although steer clear of those trying to diversify out of the basic business. San Diego's utility, Sempra,

yields only 2 percent, but some say its nonutility operations, such as pipelines and liquefied natural gas, give it an excellent future. And there will be some opportunities in big banks once the mortgage threat clears, but that may be some time.

What about some innocent charwomen and piano players? There may be some in San Diego. The temporary staffing companies are out of favor on Wall Street now. AMN Healthcare Services, the largest such firm in health industries, has seen

its stock plunge from a high of \$29.10 last year to below \$17, although earnings and revenues continue to do well. There are problems: demand in the company's largest market, California, is on the weak side. Long-range hospital administrators may use fewer temps and hire permanent staff. Chairman Steve Francis recently sold \$52 million of shares; that's not too comforting. All told, however, this stock may be a case of an innocent rounded up in a raid.

The market is pounding apparel-retailing stocks too. Shares of Charlotte Russe

Holding, whose 390 stores target younger women, have been more than halved from their high of almost \$34 last year. But revenue is advancing, profits are holding steady, expansion proceeds, and the company is packing more buyers into its stores. Ashworth, a designer and seller of sportswear, is different. Its sales and earnings are coming down, and it recently cleaned out top management. The stock is down from last year's high of \$8.61 to above \$3.50. It pared its losses in the fourth quarter and the stock jumped. Still, it may deserve that paddy wagon. ■

weren't supposed to tell anybody any of his circumstances. So [representatives of the medical examiner] showed up at the service to kind of critique us and watch how we did the first service. But in the newspaper the next day was a whole story about [Adam], how he was found, where he came from, the

details of where he was thrown away. And the County immediately canceled us and said, 'We gave you specific orders not to divulge that information.' I said, 'We didn't say a word, we never mentioned anything, we didn't tell a soul.' Come to find out that the person that wrote the story had spoken directly to someone in the Medical Examiner's Office who told her everything. So once they found out that we didn't do it, that it was one of their own personnel, we got the go-ahead to continue."

The other snag with Adam's burial involved the minister who volunteered to speak at the service. "Somebody asked me, 'What should we tell the minister to say?' " Davey recalls. "I said, 'We shouldn't have to tell him anything. Ministers know what to do at a gravesite service.'

But the minister at that first service made Davey regret the decision not to give talk guidelines. "[He] used the word 'abortion,' he used the word 'kill,' he used the phrase 'thrown in the trash.' He said,

'What an awful mother.' He brought up all this horrible stuff. And we were thinking, 'Don't mention any of those words, because what happened yesterday doesn't pertain to today. Today is a new day.' '

At all of the services since Adam's, Davey and other members of the nonprofit have given guidelines to the ministers who volunteer to speak. "The only thing that we say is, 'Don't mention what an awful mom. Don't mention how cruel this was. Don't mention anything that happened yesterday. Focus on today. Today this baby is going home with a lot of people that care, a lot of people that love him.'

Catholic priests, protestant ministers, rabbis, and shamans from around San Diego and as far away as Chicago have spoken at Garden of Innocence services. "We've had [representatives from] 32 different churches come, and they all volunteer. And we have more lined up who want to come for future services."

Though the clergy have varied, one constant has been

the Catholic fraternal organization the Knights of Columbus. "They've come out for every service," Davey says. "The first service, there were about 7. And the last service that we just did, there were about 30. But we have had as many as 70 there at one time. They give a lot of dignity to our services. They just give it an amazing amount of love. We just buried our 98th baby two weeks ago, and we are preparing for when we get our 100th because it is going to be a huge service, and the Knights of Columbus are going to be putting on the whole thing themselves. So it will be mostly a Catholic service, though we will have other people there. We will have a whole church choir there, from Good Shepherd [Catholic Parish in Mira Mesa]."

The Knights' involvement in Garden of Innocence was accidental — or providential. "One of the members of our group, Tony Miller," Davey recalls, "one of his relatives had passed away and left him with a sword. And so he went to a Catholic church to find

out if he could donate it to the Knights of Columbus. He started talking to them about the Garden of Innocence, and they said, 'We would like to be involved in that.' We have had Knights from as far away as Connecticut come and do a service. They are an amazing bunch of men."

Most of the 98 babies buried at the Garden of Innocence were not newborns found in the trash, like Adam. "Those are called unidentified," Davey explains, "the ones that are found along the street or thrown in the trash or thrown in the sewer. We have had 10 or 12 of them. The rest are abandoned. Abandoned babies are those that died at area hospitals and the parents walked away and left the bodies. Some are stillborn, some of them are preemies that were born too soon and died right away. Some of them lived for a while before they were abandoned. Doris lived for a month. She was Life Flighted to San Diego from Orange County for immediate openheart surgery at Children's Hospital, where she lived for a month. During that month, not one mother came to see her, not one grandmother, nobody. And then after a month, she died, and she ended up being certified abandoned. But during that month, the nurses at the hospital bond with these children so fast. So we explain to the hospital that we are going to take care of them. And we have had some nurses come to our services."

Davey reports that nurses who come to services of babies they cared for say they receive a sense of closure. Others have as well. "When Michaela was found in the mountains, I called the woman that found her, the jogger that found her, and told her that we were going to be taking care of her. She came, and it gave her great closure, because she never knew what would have happened to her. And the man that found Michael in the sewer, I called him to tell him that we were going to be taking care of him, and he came. And he said it was wonderful to see the dignity that this baby he had found in the sewer got."

Though she doesn't know for sure, Davey is almost cer-

tain that mothers of babies abandoned at hospitals have come to the Garden of Innocence to see their babies buried. "We believe that we have had maybe one or two mothers come that knew about it, but they never let us know. We think they were the mothers because they were crying uncontrollably. But they didn't speak to anybody."

Parents who have abandoned their children at hospitals are not prosecuted.

"It's not against the law to walk away," Davey says.

Before Garden of Innocence, dead babies abandoned at hospitals were cremated and their ashes scattered at sea along with those of indigents found dead around the county.

Now that the Garden of Innocence is up and running in San Diego, Davey is trying to start gardens in other states. Efforts are under way in Texas, Washington, Missouri, and Nevada. This isn't

Davey's job. She's still a realtor. She says it's her calling. "Sometimes people will ask, 'How can you bury a baby? That is the worst thing to do in the whole wide world.' And my answer right back is, 'How can we not?' "■





Best the word- and phrase-origin guys can figure, the term came from a novel written by Daniel Defoe about the Great Plague in London in 1665. Defoe had the city's mayor declare that bodies of those who've died of the plague must be buried six feet deep to help prevent the spread of the disease. There's no historical support for this, but the book was popular enough that the expression might have spread from that source.



# He's Going All In

his started with Brian McNamee saying he injected Roger Clemens with steroids and human growth hormone from 1998 to 2001. Fast forward to Monday, the Clemens press conference, and a secretly recorded telephone

As someone who routinely does telephone interviews, I can tell you if the other person doesn't know you're recording, you have the power. You know what not to say and what subjects to avoid. You can move the conversation into areas you'd like and prod the other person into saying things you want him to say. Afterward, you decide which sections to make public. By the way, sections of the Clemens/Brian McNamee phone-conversation tape were bleeped out.

But, it was an interesting conversation, both men revealing nothing that could damage their case while prodding the other person to compromise himself. The long, 17-minute conversation was unnaturally vague on both

Clemens says, "I don't know why you said I used steroids." This can be understood in two ways: Clemens doesn't know why McNamee ratted him out or Clemens doesn't know why McNamee made up a story.

McNamee says, "I'm in your corner. I didn't want this to happen, I also don't want to go to jail." Is McNamee saying he doesn't want to go to jail so he's telling the truth to the feds, or he doesn't want to go to jail so he's giving the feds what they want to hear?

Clemens says, "So much of it is untrue." How much of "it" is untrue? Which specific parts are untrue?

What would be the first sentence out of your mouth if you were Clemens talking to your accuser for the first time since his statements became public? How about, "WHY IN THE FUCK ARE YOU LYING ABOUT ME!?" That would be the second sentence, the third sentence, the fourth sentence, and on until you got an

defense. Attack, threaten, sue. It worked for Jones. For awhile. Turns out she was attacking and threatening while negotiating with the feds to become a government witness. The feds decided she was unreliable and withdrew. Jones pled guilty.

Clemens, by using this tactic, provokes the wrong sorts of people: congressmen (who see headlines), Jeff Novitzky, the IRS special agent who nailed Barry Bonds (who sees a high-profile arrest), reporters (who see several months' worth of stories), and lawyers (who see money). Clemens has called them out.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform had previously scheduled a hearing on the Mitchell Report with baseball suits: baseball commissioner Bud Selig and union boss Donald Fehr, among others. Baseball players were not going to be called as witnesses.

Now the committee has "invited" Clemens to testify along with Andy Pettitte and Chuck Knoblauch (former Yankees teammates), Kirk Radomski (ex-Mets clubhouse guy and steroid dealer/government witness), and Brian McNamee. All the fellas must be happy that Clemens made this time in the national spotlight happen for

So far, Clemens has made a pouty video that wound up on YouTube, the 60 Minutes interview, followed by filing a lawsuit against McNamee for defamation, followed the next day by a nationally televised press conference where he promised to attend and testify at a congressional hearing scheduled for January 16.

Clemens has thereby beckoned McNamee's lawyers to come on down to Texas and have a deposition party. He has given himself several opportunities to testify under oath, where every word he says will be gone over by many lawyers looking for anything they can use.

No one born of woman can come out of a serious investigation into his life looking clean. Clemens won't be the first. It is already apparent Clemens can't keep his mouth shut.

"We went to Europe four or five years ago," said

20something pastor Jeff Holmes, "and we saw that the church...was not really relevant to the real life of most people the young people, especially. They view the church as more of a museum. We see that happening in America today. A lot of churches that want to continue to have a voice have gone into what they call 'bridge ministries.' They'll have cafés and things like that...different things can happen in different spaces. For us, the architecture dictates that we'll probably never be bigger than 50 people. This is a very niche program, an outreach to find the artists

in the community."

The community is
North Coast Church, a
proper megachurch with
multiple campuses and
a slew of worship services. The niche program
is Canvas, a loosely structured gathering in the
main campus' urban
coffee bar. "The sermon
may dictate our theme,"
explained Holmes, "but

we have permission to break away from the paradigm of songs, sermon, offering, go home. Every week, it's something different."

Sunday, the center table bore colored pencils, construction paper, scissors, glue, pipe cleaners, and three bags of artist's clay. Holmes invited the congregation to come and pick up materials as he read from Psalm 40, written by David, "an awesome poet and musician, a man's man who fought battles yet also had a sensitive side and could express some pretty intimate things.... 'I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry. He lifted me up out of the slimy pit.... He set my feet on a rock.... He put a new song in my mouth, a hymn of praise to our God."

The sermon (edited down) played on three flat-screen TVs. Some took notes and followed along in their Bibles; others sculpted figures or drew with the colored pencils. Many sipped coffee drinks from the bar. Pastor Larry Osborne stressed the need for small gatherings of other Christians to aid in spiritual growth and lamented, "We've confused going to church with being the

church.... You are a second-class Christian if you're not connected to other Christians.... We all need support and accountability, and it comes as iron sharpens iron."

Holmes took support and accountability as his theme for the service's project. "You're all artistic people and you don't like rules, so all I'm going to tell you is that this part of the room is going to deal with support, and this part of the room with accountability. And you have to do this as a group."

One couple — professed newcomers — excused themselves, saying, "I'm sorry — that was fun, but we're really not comfortable with this." The rest of the group split up: about ten people gathered on the accountability side, and nearly twice that over in support. After 15 minutes, they presented. Support went first, a narrator explaining three tableaus: a woman, standing, surrounded by others with hands on her shoulders. Another woman, falling but being caught by an equal number of hands. And a third

woman, horizontal and held aloft by those around her. "The first one is solid in her walk with God and solid in the support around her. The second has fallen away, but her support system is catching her. The third has totally walked away from God, but she's being supported totally back to Him."

Then came accountability's diorama: a woman fashioned from clay and a pipe-cleaner horse standing at a fork in the road, represented by popsicle sticks. "The rider is trying to pull the horse to the narrow path," explained one man. "But the horse sees an easier path. The rider has to be able to communicate with the horse." Another pointed out that the narrow road was labeled "friendship, camaraderie, being together, and singing together," while the wide road was "isolation, despondence, television services — things that let you stay in bed all day



Holmes asked for observations. "It's harder to choose to go someplace where you'll be accountable. That group was a lot smaller." "You can't have accountability without people to be supportive of you." "You have to trust the people in your support group to be accountable to them."

Finally, Holmes called the group to stand in a circle. "The Bible teaches that man and woman were created in the image of God. Look around at the image of God. Jesus...we ask that we would remember that we are your image bearers. We might be the only God that anyone ever sees. Help us reflect him well."

What happens when we die?

"I think that's determined by how we lived on earth," said Holmes. "I would say that if we come to God on His terms, then we will spend eternity with Him. If we don't, then we face the consequences of that."

# **BestBuys**

The after-Christmas glut of stuff landed hard on the Kelly home — every surface was laden with goodies waiting to find a place on our crowded shelves. Hubby Patrick and I decided it was time to de-clutter. Three days later, we had finished sorting trash from treasure from things to be donated, and we stared in awe at our pile of discarded elec-

tronics: two computer monitors, a TV/VCR combo, an old vacuum cleaner, two caller- ID boxes, an ancient microwave, and three cell phones. Some of it worked a little, some of it didn't; none of it was wanted. But I was hesitant to just send it all to the dump.

Turns out my hesitation had an upside — I learned that Mike Dolbow of Green Planet Solutions Inc. (760-639-0672; www.atotalgps.com) really didn't want me to send all that stuff to the dump. "That's electronic waste," he said. "It's our name for any item that runs on a battery or wall power that has reached the end of its life. Besides what you've got, there's clock radios, home telephones, printers...and the batteries themselves. They're all pretty much toxic because they contain heavy metals - things like lead, cadmium, and sezium. Some of them contain arsenic. Cathode-ray tubes are some of the most toxic — those are the tubes

in TVs and computer monitors."

Dolbow's concern is that such toxins won't just stay in the dump. For example, "Polydiethylether was a fire retardant used in electronic products for years. It's been outlawed now, but it's still in a lot of products manufactured prior to 2006," products likely to hit the trash heap in the next few years. "If not recycled properly, polydiethylether can get into the groundwater, and from there, it can accumulate in the body over years, causing birth defects and other damage to the body." Computer monitors contain a powder that may itself contain aluminum dioxide, "which is very harmful. If a monitor is cracked, we collect it while wearing proper safety gear and box it up separately. Batteries contain materials that are even more toxic than monitors. Never throw out batteries — car batteries,

cell phone batteries, even alkaline batteries."

Recycling keeps this sort of stuff out of the dump, but unfortunately, said Dolbow, "a lot of recyclers are selling the electronics overseas" because of the high profit margin."There,

the recyclers don't have the same environmental controls or human safety controls we have here. They'll take big piles of wire and burn off the insulation. They'll do the same with PC boards; the toxins just get released into the air. Workers wear no protective gear. I started this company to make sure things get recycled 100 percent."

Ecofriendly recycling, he said, avoids that fate by making sure that "every single material that's being processed is properly recycled or destroyed. We're a collection service. We bring the materials to E-World or IMS, and they separate the materials. They'll reclaim copper and

glass and send a lot of material to a large facility up north. Plastics are recycled into other materials. Toxins are removed either chemically or mechanically. Metals are crushed or melted down in a slow melt process that doesn't produce toxic fumes." Even batteries get crushed and separated into their constituent parts "for use in other batteries."

Not every item Dolbow picks up goes into the recycling stream. "If we get good computers, we'll remove the hard drives and replace them — sometimes, we get new hard drives donated or trade for them at small computer stores. Then we'll refurbish the computer and donate it. We've donated some to Head Start, some to families. We're trying to start up a refurbishing school program — if students come in and put in a couple of hours of labor assembling computers, they'll get to take home one of their own."

> Working with the schools is how Dolbow hopes to make recycling a culture instead of a cost. "Processing

this stuff is actually cheaper" than manufacturing from all new materials, "but it's not a culture. It's more of an ideal — something that's cool and earthy if you're into it, but if you're not, you don't do it. The best way to make sure ecofriendly recycling happens is to instill it in the younger generation. We offer drives within the

schools: we ask the kids to flyer neighborhoods. People bring their electronic waste to the school on a Saturday and drop it off at our truck. If we collect 20,000 pounds of material, the kids get a free dance — I used to be a DJ and still do it on the side."

Older folks, hopefully, will take a lesson from his business model. "By law now, companies can't throw electronics away. There's a state service you can call, and the service contacts a local recycler who then charges you to come pick up your electronic waste. But there's a state fund through the EPA that pays the recycler 20 to 48 cents a pound for the stuff. If I'm collecting money from the government, why should I charge you to pick it up? We make money from recycling materials through our downstream partners. There is no reason why we should charge the public."

The business is still getting going right now, North County pickups are free, while other San Diego areas require a \$5 surcharge for gas — something Dol-

bow hopes to eliminate as business grows. And already, Dolbow is seeing some results. We get a lot of vacuum cleaners, microwaves, DVD players. We pick up about 200 computers and monitors a week, though our goal for the monitors is 1000. We've picked up just under 1000 cell phones. Right now, we're targeting business areas, but we'll do curbside pickup. We've had a couple of neighborhood associations ask us to flyer their neighborhood and then go through two days later. Or people can call us for an appointment. And if an item is too heavy for you to move, the crew will remove it for you."

# **Turn Off**

Lo! Men have become the tools of their tools.

— Henry David Thoreau

remember my first time like it was yesterday. My heart beat fast with the excitement and trepidation of journeying into virgin territory. It was David's idea. Like walking backwards, it was too unnatural a concept to ever occur to me on my own. We had only been dating for a few weeks, but I already trusted him enough to follow his lead. So it was, one Friday evening around five years ago, after David had loosened me up with a home-cooked meal and a few

glasses of wine, that I did the unthinkable: I climbed over my new beau, dug through my purse, and, when my fingers found what they'd been searching for, I pressed the button that turned off my cell phone.

The 36 hours that followed my bold action were both blissful and hellish. On Saturday, we were lazy, ordering takeout and watching movies. But all

the while, I couldn't keep my mind from wandering back to my phone. Who might be trying to reach me? How would they manage to survive if I didn't answer their calls?

Telecommunication anxiety has plagued me ever since I purchased my first pager while still in high school. When that thing beeped, it was as though a person were standing beside me, saying, "Hey, Barb," and if I didn't respond immediately, it was like I was turning my back on that person in the flesh. I had an uncanny feeling that people could see me reading their number on the small display and that I would hurt their feelings or piss them off if I didn't get to a phone and call them as soon as was

humanly possible. The situation became more desperate when I got my first cell phone, a clunky black Sony Ericsson. The ringing phone, like a crying baby, demanded my immediate attention. Missed calls were not an option.

On Sunday morning of that momentous weekend five years ago, I turned my phone back on to discover that four people had left me 25 messages. David was baffled. Being older than me, he could remember when people did not have answering machines in their homes, when the concept of mobile communication devices existed only on shows like Star Trek. The horrified look on David's face at the apparent expectation of availability I had cultivated among my friends and family members brought me to the tragic realization that I had been fixed to an invisible leash. Since that moment, I have been slowly coaxing the telecommunication monkey from my back.

One recent afternoon, my mother and I were sipping coffee in a shop near my home. Twenty minutes into our visit, my phone rang. Without checking, I quickly reached into my bag and switched the mode to "silent," which I had forgotten to do prior to meeting Mom.

"Who is it?" Mom asked.
"Doesn't matter," I answered.
Mom looked concerned. "What if it's important?"

"Then they'll leave a message."

"What if it's someone with big news?"

"Then I'll hear the news later."

Now she looked worried. "What if it's

"Then they should call 9-1-1," I

stated.

Mom seemed mystified by my nonchalance. As if to test the extent of my unflappability, she suggested the worstcase scenario: "What if someone was in an accident, and they need your blood?"

"They'll have to find someone else's," I said.

"What if they'll die if they don't get yours?"

"Then they'll die," I said evenly. In answer to my mother's gasp, I added, "And I would be sad." Mom seemed uncomfortable with my answer, so I expounded a bit. "As my friend Jen once told me, my cell phone is for *my* convenience, not other people's. Having a phone doesn't mean I'm 'on-call.' No one is paying me to answer this thing every time it rings. Right now, I'm enjoying coffee with my mother, who is sitting in front of me, and who I would like to give my full attention without needless interruptions."

After a few moments of silence, Mom said, "Okay then," and we picked up our previous conversation where we'd left off.

It's easy to expect an immediate response when everyone is just a text message away. Everyone, that is, except my father. Not only does Dad not have a cell phone or pager, he has no call waiting on his landline. "I find it rude when someone interrupts a conversation to get the other line," Dad has told me. When calling Dad, my sisters and I are often confronted by the infuriating indifference of the busy signal. While on one of his daily peregrinations, Dad doesn't seem to mind the inconvenience of having to track down one of the three remaining payphones in







town whenever he wants to make a call. I, however, find it aggravating when I screen unknown numbers, then hear Dad on my voicemail saying something like, "Hey, I'm down the street, seeing if you're around," leaving me with no way to call him back to say, "Yes, I'm around, please come over!"

The women in my family are notoriously impatient, a condition the men in our lives must forever battle. We don't "call," we "attack." For example (and these names are interchangeable for any one of us), Heather calls Jane on her cell phone. When Jane doesn't answer, Heather hangs up and immediately dials Jane's home phone. When that line isn't picked up, Heather (having left no voicemail yet), calls Jane's cell phone again, maybe even two more times, before leaving a message. The reason we do this?

Because incessant calling increases the sense of urgency at the other end of the line, and the sister on the receiving end will invariably pick up. We do it, because it works. Simon, David, Sean, and Brad commiserate over the relentless ringing in their ears.

In the way a thrillseeker is addicted to adrenaline rushes, I was hooked on a false sense of urgency that resulted from my distorted sense of importance. Despite my mother's fears, I know it is more probable that all the molecules of air will simultaneously rush to the same corner of my office than it is that my not answering my phone will cause someone to die. I was a slave to my cell, not because I thought someone might need me but because I had an irrational fear that if I didn't answer, people would stop calling.

While settling into

our red leather sofa for a movie the other night, I asked David if he remembered that first time.

"You mean when I suggested you turn off your phone, and you reacted as if I'd asked you to bungee jump off the Coronado Bridge with me? Yeah, I remember," he said.

"Come on, give me some credit. I did it, didn't I?'


"Oh, yeah, you did it, but you were freaked out until you turned it back



t the Mira Mesa Recreation Center, playing for my fifth-grade youth basketball team, I watched as my coach threw a chair onto the court in anger. On another occasion, the referee threw my coach out of the gym during an argument. The following year, with a different coach, my grandmother was in town from Los Angeles, watching me play for the first time. I stole the ball, dribbled up-court, and missed a layup. My coach was furious. He put his hands around his neck and yelled, "Choker! You're a choker! You missed an easy layup!" He threw his hands up in disgust. I lowered my head. I didn't even want to look over to where my family was sitting. A teammate put his arm around me. "Did Coach even see the last three baskets you scored?" I glanced at the scoreboard and wondered if the coach realized we were up by 16 points.




I look back on the memory and wonder: Why are coaches — adults — so hard on children? At the youth level, between ages 4 and 16, children should be taught the fundamentals of the game, sportsmanship, and fun.

When you get into high school

sports, that's when you get cut from the team if you aren't good. Or benched if you miss easy layups. You may have to run laps at practice if you forget a play.

On the news this year, we saw video of a youth wrestling match. An angry father jumped out of the stands and

tackled a 14-year-old getting the better of his son. He claimed the child was doing an illegal move but failed to address why he didn't let the ref handle it (that father is being charged with injuring a minor).

Competitive parents can be tough. I

coached youth basketball for a few years. In Poway, Padres Tony Gwynn and Garry Templeton were always mellow while their sons played. But in La Costa, I coached a tall, skinny kid on the fifthand sixth-grade team who wasn't aggressive at rebounding or scoring.

mother came out to half-court in high heels to scream at the 16-year-old volunteer referee.

And he was really quiet. His dad, however, was a screamer. Not only did he yell at referees, he'd yell instructions to his son. One play was designed for his son to set a pick underneath, then run and post up at the free-throw line. The ball would come to him, and he'd pass to either of the two guards that were cutting to the basket. Well, Dad yelled for his son to shoot the ball. 
start their little girls' training sessions so early in the morning? What about the tendency to begin training at such a young age, hoping to get the next Nancy Kerrigan?


# (IN)FAMOUS SPORTS PARENTS







A ball hit to left field wasn't thrown to the proper base. And when a coach told a kid to throw the ball to "second base," the child took the instruction literally and threw the ball at the second-base bag. If not for the second baseman's quick reflexes, he would've been hit in the foot.

Late in the game, the kids all took three pitches. If they didn't connect, then they were to hit off the T. When

Gerald's son was, for some reason, given an extra pitch, the other coach screamed, "We talked about this before the game!" The coaches yelled, and people walked briskly toward the dugout. I wondered how, with a bunch of kindergarten kids, anyone could care if an extra pitch was thrown. Yet the adults screamed bloody murder, face-to-face, in front of the children.

## COACH PAPA

Tom Czarnecki is a coach for the Tigers. He works wonderfully with children. He makes jokes and explains things well, and when one kid doesn't want to play in the outfield yet wants to go up to bat, he lets the child do so; he also tells how the other kids all played in the outfield and that maybe next time, he should do that as well. The kids call him "Coach Papa." I asked him about the fight I'd witnessed. Why would coaches of five-year-olds argue?

"Well, the other team's coach has been trying to get all the teams to throw pitches to the kids. I was against it from the beginning. They're too young for pitches. This is a T-ball league. They're still learning how to hold a bat, approach the plate, and all that. I had a heart attack in October. This was going to be my son-in-law's team. I was just helping out, since my grandson is playing. They all decided they would throw three pitches to each kid in the last inning. Some of our kids weren't making contact, and I told my sonin-law to go tell the other team's coach that it wasn't working out. And then one of our kids got

an extra pitch thrown. And he started screaming about it."

That day at the field, I had overheard a few parents talking about how competitive this manager was. One said, "I heard a player ask him once what the score was, and he angrily said, 'It's a tie. It's always a tie!' I think he's mad they don't keep score, and in his mind, if it's zero to zero, what's the point of even playing?"

I asked Tom why this other coach cares so much about the kids being rushed into taking

pitches. He said, "Well, his son is on that team. He's one of the best players; his kid can hit really well. He wants him to progress as fast as he can, I suppose. But there's really no reason to rush. What he has to think about is the kid on the team that can't hit the ball and put himself in that boy's shoes. It's about these kids having fun and learning the sport. If you don't get that, you're really missing it all. We have a retarded boy on our team. He's beautiful. He's the happiest kid in the world. The

look in his eyes...that's the reward you should get doing this."

It reminded me of a story that happened last year — a 29-year-old coach with a response opposite of Tom's. In Pennsylvania, this coach offered one of his 8-yearold players \$25 to "hit" a teammate with autism — with pitches to the groin and head. The coach hoped it would injure the autistic player, and then he wouldn't be forced to play the kid. He was convicted for corruption of minors and criminal solicitation to commit simple assault.

Tom told me: "I remember once when the coaches were drafting kids in the 'majors' and this 12-year-old wasn't going to be drafted. They told him to go down a league. He really shouldn't have had to go down a league. He was ready to play majors. He was so disappointed. I told him I'd take him. He was thrilled. These coaches would rather win than teach the kids or put a smile on their faces. I want to make it fun for them, so that the next year, they want to come back. I saw this kid working years later, and he yelled out my name with a smile on his face. It was great."

I asked him how long he'd been coaching.

"I had my first team in 1957, in the Detroit area. My boss wanted to keep the kids off the street around his store. With my own kids, it was around 1973. I got to San Diego in 1959, in the Marine Corps, and I met my wife. When we went to the Philippines or Saigon, we gave the kids baseballs. They just wanted to learn. Children love playing. There isn't that competitive winning aspect of it."

Have you always just coached the five-year-olds?

"No, no. I did the whole thing. T-ball, majors, pony. I've seen it all. My son, son-in-law, they all got into it, too. One of them is in La Mesa. One is now working in Allied Gardens, coaching. And I made sure they were having fun when they were kids.

What some parents don't realize is, with four- and five-year-olds, they are still too young. So, you have fun with them. I had one kid show me a spider he found on the ground. During one

practice, a player told me he was ready to go play on the swings, so I let him. That's what you have to do. Like I said, you want them coming back the following year. And I think those coaches that are yelling at them this young might not get that. Maybe you can do a 'good cop, bad cop.' But when you do...I did 20 years of Pop Warner football. If you get on them about something, you should build them back up even more. So, if there's discipline and finger-shaking, you make them feel even better when they do something right. And that, again, is for when the

of town, to find out which of his three kids had a soccer game next, which led to my witnessing another adult who screamed in front of tenyear-olds.

One kid was trying to head the ball. The defender ducked beneath him. The referee deemed this dangerous and threw a red card. An assistant coach didn't like the call and started screaming at the ref. The assistant coach was thrown out and had to leave the field. The problem with that? His son was in the game. When the boy saw his dad leaving, he started to cry. Can you imagine the many things the child could've been crying over? He might have wondered if his dad was going to jail. He might have wondered how he'd get home. Or, he might have simply been embarrassed. All ruining a pleasant Saturday

afternoon.

I asked psychotherapist and certified thanatologist Ruth Schriebman, who is in private practice, to tell me her thoughts on these overly competitive adults.

"We live in a competitive society," she said. "I remember when my daughter was seven. We had her signed up for soccer. We lived in a diverse area. There were often mothers and fathers, even at practice, yelling and screaming for their kids to score goals. The competition was intense. One time the coach, a local physician, took the kids back to his house. This was before cell phones. I showed up and my daughter wasn't at the field and I panicked. When I finally found out where she was and picked her up, I went ballistic. All the coach said was 'But...she scored a goal today.'



Right then I took her out of soccer. We live behind a grammar school, and I hear the coaches yelling at the kids. For some coaches, this is a big part of their life. The kids are the focal point. And many parents live vicariously through their children. Having an athletic superstar can be a way into a good college on scholarship. There are parents who are hoping athletics will pay for college. I know somebody who is in the sports

industry. He played professionally and coached on all levels. The family knows the kids won't get in on scholastic achievements, but the kids are great athletes. This is what they are depending

Is there any type of counseling that can help aggressive coaches or parents realize the effects of constant yelling? How many sessions are necessary?

"You can't say [whether] someone might need three sessions or eight," Schriebman said. "Everyone is different. And, yes, it would be great if leagues had mandatory rules and meetings before the season started, stating that if a parent or coach acted inappropriately on the field, there would be ramifications."


If they were shown videos of how insane they look, would that help?

"I suppose. But you can't mandate people to go to anger management. Occasionally, someone will become a coach because they like the attention. And it's not against the law for them to yell. I would suggest, though, not having the parent as the head coach. It becomes too personal. Maybe it works better if they are assistant coaches."

Why don't other parents say or do anything? It's almost as if they accept this behavior.

"Sometimes, the yelling is encouraged. Sometimes, they are trying to distract an opponent so they goof. And, really, parents who act this way...well, it has to do with internal values. Many times their behavior is fear-based. The child is an extension of the parent. If the kid doesn't perform, the parent feels humiliated. And that's a bad feeling.

"Empathy develops at around six or seven years of age. You start to realize you can't treat someone like that. But in some adults that awareness isn't fully developed. In a competitive atmosphere, it shows. They haven't matured, and it carries over."







coaches yelling. I played high school ball at Mira Mesa, and our coach had to yell at us and make us run laps if we screwed up. We knew the deal. It's what coaches do.

their dreams through their children. I never coached mine. I wanted to be a dad first. And I could be a tough coach."

Couldn't you do both? They would have respected and understood your toughness.

"Sometimes you can't do that. What if something isn't in the best interest of the team? Are you going to tell your son he isn't getting it done? I would rather be

there in the stands to give them a hug after the game and tell them I love them and cheer them on."

When you watched your kids play and saw other parents yelling, did you ever approach them? I'd have to think a 6'11" former NBA player would garner respect if you told them they didn't have the right approach with their kids.

"No. You can't really

do that. I just tried to lead by example, by cheering my kids on and being positive. Sports has that dark side, and bullies seem to come in and think it's their world. But the kids are smart. You can't fool them. They know what's real out there. They know the people that are out of control, and they want to get away from those people, and they say, 'Let's get out of here. This is not for us.'

I still can't get past the fact that you don't think a college coach should ever yell. Don't you think there are the occasional times a player needs to be yelled at? I think of Vince Lombardi yelling at Bart Starr. Or even Burgess Meredith yelling at Rocky in the movies. I think sometimes coaches need to yell at players, and when they're teenagers, the players understand that. The player might not be concentrating, and a good yell helps them

"No! Never. It's not necessary. It isn't. Listen...a situation isn't going to change with one speech or one play being called. But with lessons and values, and reinforcements of these things, the players will get it, without the overbearing bullying that some coaches want to continue with. Coaches impact lives and should show compassion and unconditional love. Coaches that are bullies care only about themselves."

The Jr. NBA and WNBA have Ray Allen of the Bucks and coach Doc Rivers, you, and a few others involved. Is your passion for teaching and influencing kids one of the reasons you got involved?

"Yes. We constantly work with children. We're there to coach them, mentor them, and council them when they need us. There's over 20 million kids playing basketball in the U.S. And the program has been hugely successful on a global scale since its inception four years ago. I impart the same values that I did to my sons on a daily basis, along with the



fundamentals, hustle, and everything else; learning to both win and lose with class and dignity and compete like a true sportsman. I get to coach a team during the All-Star weekend. There's nothing like seeing a smile on a person's face. When I see a smile on my own child's face, I know I'm the luckiest guy in the world."

I read once that your dad wasn't into sports

but was a piano player. Would he have liked it more to see you in a piano recital instead of on a basketball court?

"My dad would've supported me in whatever I wanted to do. Like I said, I'm very lucky. My parents realized sports were part of a bigger world, and they supported my basketball and my dreams. And that bigger world included education, literature, art, social awareness, and music. My dad led by example. And hard work. He had to work three jobs to put food on the table. He was always supportive. He was more into the arts and not ath-

letics. He sang in the church choir and played Mozart on the piano. But, 15 years ago, I told him my legs didn't work anymore and that I wanted him to teach me piano. He said, 'Bill, I'm a very proud dad.' I told him I was a very lucky, old son. He passed away 3 years ago..."

A few days later I got a phone call and email from Walton. He sends me pages and pages of research on the subject.

I talked to another former San Diego athlete.

Brian Sipe was the SDSU quarterback who led the NCAA in passing in 1971. He went on to become the Cleveland Browns' all-time leading passer and was the league MVP in 1980. Since he's been coaching the football team at Santa Fe Christian High in Solana Beach for a few years now, I thought his opinions on how parents and coaches relate to kids would be enlightening.

I told him first about my disagreement with Bill Walton over the issue of coaches yelling. He also disagreed with Walton. "Coaches can be successful no matter what their temperament," Sipe said. "When I became a coach, I had no experience. I was playing catchup. I had this book by Lou Holtz I was skimming through, and it said a player should look for the three things in a coach: is it someone who can be trusted, someone committed to excellence, and does this person care about me? If you can answer yes to those three questions, it doesn't matter the temperament, or if the coach yells. The player understands the goals of the coach and respects that. They realize that the person is engaging them and is someone who cares about them. If a child is too young to ask those questions, then I think they're too young to play organized sports."

sports, when the children are ten? Obviously, the kids gain something from that experience, and a coach doesn't need to yell.

Sipe said, "I think parents get their kids into organized sports too young. They should have free play and organize it themselves. When I was in La Mesa, at around 11 or 12 years old, my team won the Little League World Series in Pennsylvania. That was the highest level of youth players, arguably, in the world. When I was coaching my son's Little League team

range, I couldn't get them to understand things I thought were basic. If there was a runner on second base and a ball is hit to them, where the ball should be thrown. They were unprepared. I got so frustrated, I told them not to bring their gloves to the next practice, and we played 'work up' with a Wiffle ball. Growing up, we always played that. You could play it with just a few kids in a garage or a whole bunch out in the park. They weren't even familiar with that game.

in Del Mar, the same age

It's because kids don't even seem to go out on their own and play the sports anymore without it being organized by adults."

Do you think that has to do with computer games, TV, and other interests kids have?

"It could be a 'which came first/chicken or the egg' scenario. If you were a six-year-old wearing an old uniform, with adults telling you what to do and where to go, would you enjoy it? Or would you quit playing and have more fun in front of the computer? When I

was a kid, we rode our bikes to the fields for games, and usually our parents weren't there. We were surprised if they were. Now the parents are there, and sometimes that's when problems arise. And in some of the youth games, they don't keep score. Well, if you aren't going to keep score, why have umpires and adults even involved? Let the kids just sign up, pick teams, and play. They can make their own rules."

Well, that might be a little too unorganized. You might get bullies,

"So what," said Sipe. "That's all part of growing up. They'll learn to deal with the bullies. Hey, I'm 59 and I still have bullies in my life [laughs]. It's the same thing with players all getting trophies. I don't think that's necessary. Sometimes kids need to learn, that's a part of life, that you don't always win or receive an award. And if the kids want to keep score, let them keep score."

As a former player at the highest level of the game, do you expect

more from kids?

"Probably. I coached youth soccer for three years when my daughter played. And since I'm a former player, people were quick to offer me coaching jobs. But playing and coaching are different assignments. Success can sometimes disqualify you from being a good coach. Bill Cowher [former Steelers' coach, now CBS commentator on NFL Today] was a teammate of mine in Cleveland. He was always just barely making the team. But he survived by exploring every aspect of





the game. He was learning to become a coach back then."

I've seen Cowher do some yelling, but he's yelling at other adult NFL players. You don't see a problem with that style, obviously.

"I've played for a few gnarly coaches. I'm dating myself with that adjective. Don Coryell at SDSU, he was soft. But, Forrest Gregg in the NFL was intimidating. A rough guy. But I knew what their commitments were, and I didn't mind going into battle with them."

How do you handle crazy parents?

"My mom said she remembers some hassles in the stands when I was a kid, but I don't remember any back then. Parents need to learn their kids aren't perfect, and the kids need to learn for themselves. In the beginning of the season, I let people know how things are going to be. I tell them the reason their kids come out is to win a championship and I'm going to try to help them do that. I think certain standards are important. Sometimes a kid might

not play as much as someone else or be recognized the same way. This is a time when life collides with sports, and it's the peak of their athletic experience. Most will have none after high school. None will be paid to play professionally. And if that rare player does make it to that level, it won't be as enjoyable a time as it was in high school."

Do you think crazy parents get that way because professional sports is their ultimate goal?

"Some parents think

that. I tell them that 20 or fewer get scholarships in Division I out of the San Diego Section. That's everything south of Riverside — over three million kids. It's amazing how early in a child's life the parent is considering athletic scholarships. And, them wanting their child to be a professional athlete — there's not a more dysfunctional group of people around."

Quarterback Todd Marinovich, who played briefly for the Raiders, had a dad pushing him to play quarterback at an early age, making him

throw passes and do weight training strenuously before the age of 12. He ended up doing heroin and being arrested for a variety of things.

I asked Sipe if it's easier for him, as former NFL player, to talk to these parents.

"Yes. I get cut slack because of my playing career."

You teach at a Christian high school. How has your religion affected your coaching?

"My religion has completely [affected it]. If it weren't for my belief in God...I thought I was

done with football. But God gave me talents, and I wanted to teach these kids and give something back."

as well as a few Little League teams, I gave him a call.

Palet said, "I've always told people, with these reality shows now, if they just filmed these Little League parents and made a show out of it, it would be the best 30 minutes of TV. The parents are crazy. And so are some of the coaches."

What happened with your high school football team when you played?

"When I was 15 years old, I got in a fight in the locker room. I was defending myself and broke the shin of the best player on our team. He ended up becoming the best player in the city. The coach was mad and set me up in practices. I was the quarterback, but he started playing me at running back and telling everyone to hit me as hard as they could. One player refused. Everyone else did what the coach said. For a week, I was going home with blood coming out of my head. The coach then called me into the showers, with no one around. He told me I wasn't wanted and that I should quit. I told him I wasn't a quitter, and he put his fist in front of my face. He told me my sister was a whore, and so was my mom. He told me he wanted to fight, and I said, 'I don't fight teachers.' My mom wanted to go to the police, but my dad wouldn't let her. I was bleeding so much from my head and body...basically, because of this incident, I moved to Los Angeles to live with my grandmother. The only other option was changing schools, but the one was an allboys' school, which I didn't want to attend. The others were too far away."

One fight involving an adult and a player, Palet did witness.

"I was watching a Little League playoff game. These were 14year-olds, and the shortstop missed a fast line renew

drive. Craig Nettles wouldn't have been able to get the ball, it was hit that hard. But his dad thought he should've, and he jumped over the fence and punched his son right in the face. Coaches and umpires

grabbed him and called the cops. Other times, I see parents in the stands watching practices. I would've been mortified if my dad did that. But, they do things like compile their kids' stats and send the info to coaches. It's crazy." As a coach, what do you do to help keep par-

ents in check? "At the beginning of the season, I tell everyone to be positive. If a player makes a mistake, they

have to persevere. If the

options are yelling and wanting to kick ass, or patting someone on the back, I'm going to pat a kid on the back. If I hear a kid tell another kid, 'You suck,' I bench them. I only yell at one player. That's my son, and it's not extreme comments. It might be things like, 'Don't worry about it, move on.' Or maybe I'll tell him to focus. You have to be careful with other people's kids. There was a time my son ran into home, and he didn't know how to slide. He slowed down but ran into the catcher. The other coach grabbed my son, and I jumped over

and grabbed the coach. I was ready to knock him out. He's a friend of mine now, but he put his hands on my kid. Another guy I'm friends with got in my face, arguing over the rules. He wouldn't back down, and we almost fought."

Palet told me he had a million stories. There was a time a coach told a pitcher to hit his son with a pitch. Palet laughed. "Coaches are as bad as parents. Every year I would be voted to be the all-star coach. I think it's because the kids liked the fact that I was positive and not negative. When I hear parents in

the stands being negative, sometimes to shut them up, the umpires or coaches say, 'We can use more volunteers, if you think you can do better.' That usually shuts them up. One time, I couldn't shut this lady up. Her son was pitching, and she was yelling out stuff like 'He's afraid of you. He's overrated and he sucks.' She was going on like that, and the batter could hear this. I went up to her and said, 'That boy's parents are probably sitting ten feet from you.' She looked at me like I was crazy and continued yelling and ripping this kid."

#### KEEP QUIET AND PLAY





rather have the team winning than have a variety of players."

#### ANOTHER WALTON WEIGHS IN

I wanted to contact one last high school coach. Since Bill Walton's son Chris coaches at USD, I gave him a call. I said, "Your dad mentions in a piece he wrote that the greatest thrill for a parent in the stands is when your kid looks up at you and thanks you for coming to the game. Did he

ever surprise you by showing up for a game when he was supposed to be out of town working?"

"Actually, no. He traveled so much. That was hard. The NBA schedule usually coincided with our basketball games, and he spent two thirds of his time on the road. Every chance he could, though, he'd be at our games. That was always cool for us. Our mom was really a saint. She was the foundation for us for so long. And

she would take us to games and tournaments, often driving up to L.A."

Did your mom scream from the stands?

"No. She was mildmannered and always supported us. Our parents didn't push us to play basketball. School and education was the most important thing to them. My dad, having been injured for so much of his career, knew that it could all end. So he stressed the importance of an education. And even though they didn't push basketball, when you're 6'4" in seventh grade, you kind of weed out the other sports and gravitate toward basketball."

Did you ever play for a coach with a temper?

"No. I never did. I was blessed that I always played for great coaches — from when I was a child, up to playing for Steve Fischer at San Diego State. We went to private schools, and the



coaches there were good teachers and never over the top."

As a kid, what did you think when you saw another coach yelling?

"If I saw a coach cursing or stomping their feet, I really just felt sorry for those players. And some parents were always going up to the coach to ask why their kid didn't get more playing time. Often, those coaches had a son that played on that team. And, my dad played for coaches like K.C. Jones and Jack Ramsey. They didn't yell. They just knew what kind of basketball they wanted to see and then let you play. Basketball should be fun, whether you are 10 or 25 years old and in the NBA."

How has all this influenced you as a coach?

"I take a little from here and there and from many of the coaches I've seen over the years. I learned a lot from my

dad, too. I think sometimes there is a time and place when you need to be a little stern and tell the players to focus. But I also feel that the players should be having fun and be competitive, without being scared. If a coach yells and scares the player, the players are more worried about making a mistake. They are looking over at the bench all the time, instead of just playing. That can hurt their confidence level."

Recently, I saw my fifth-grade coach at Alliant International University on Pomerado Road. He was in the bleachers watching his son play. He wasn't yelling, throwing chairs, or causing a commotion. He had a big smile on his face. He applauded when the team scored and never once yelled. Maybe he's matured.

Of course, it helped that his son was the best player on the court. ■



## a trickster and a mischief-maker

Readers of these pages (I mean the music pages, not the pages in general) have read at one time or another the writings of Richard Meltzer. Longtime readers of rock-jazz/bluespop or miscellaneous contemporary (or even not-so-contemporary) music criticism will know who he is all right. Many of you will have wondered, at one time or another, What is the deal with this guy? Well, I'm not going to tell you.

"The people of San Diego get the best sampling of my precious bodily fluids."


Not because I'm contrary or because he is a member of some too-hip-for-you clique, an innercircle member of initiated prose pros I must protect or promote; it's just that I don't really know. I talked to him on the phone, however, last night, on the occasion of his new book, A Whore Just Like the Rest, and he seemed like a nice guy, a New York kind of guy, drinking a beer and talking about music. He would say things like, "Yeah? You think so?" sounding genuinely curious when I would offer him some choice theory of mine about his take on rock and roll, the dialectic of Meltzer

I mention his review of a piece

by John Cage included in the book. Here is that review in its entirety:

"4'33" (acoustic realization by Frank Zappa, on A Chance Operation: The John Cage Tribute, Koch International 3-7238-2 Y6x2; electronic realization by Peter Pfister, on Music for Five, Hat Art 2-6070), to be performed by a solitary musician (any instrument) sitting motionless and playing nothing for 4 minutes and 33 seconds, during which (in theory) all sorts of ambient sonic shit will get to be noticed.

"Hard to believe it, but dice don't lie: six and one, compelling me to sit (but not write) at the computer keyboard while allowing my cat to contribute an ambient review:

To say that this is typical Meltzer would be to say that the piece he is reviewing is typical John Cage. I might say that it is quintessential Meltzer though. Somebody is fucking with somebody here, and it's not Meltzer or his cat.

As I'm speaking to him, his cat is ill and a girlfriend is giving the cat IVs of something. "My cat actually wrote that," says Meltzer, and I have no doubt.

Meltzer has written for Rolling Stone, the L.A. Weekly, Creem, and Spin, to name a few. But the above review, like most of the last third of the book or so, was originally written for the San Diego Reader. Meltzer's



love-hate relationship with this place is longstanding, and he himself admits that much of his best stuff was written in, for, and about San Diego.

"All the Tired Geezers in the Sun" about Lawrence Welk Village is one of these, and — love it or hate it one must grant its status as a unique document. Meltzer has written about San Diego's peep shows and piano bars and covered the L.A. riots for a San Diego readership.

Meltzer on San Diego: "The people of San Diego get the best sampling of my precious bodily fluids. Now that I know how to write, where am I writing? For San Diego. When the response is, 'Hey! I could write that.' Maybe part of my gift [to San Diego] is, 'Hey! Go ahead and do it!' Maybe I don't have the ego attachment to it I once did. So you wannado it, Everyman, Everywoman? Go ahead and do it. You're welcome to it."

The conversation gravitates from rock writing to rock and roll itself, or "rock roll" as Meltzer often refers to it. I confess I am in danger of losing my love for it and ask him if he does not also find this happening to him.

"Oh, yeah," he says. "Just think about the whole theme of it. Once upon a time, rock and roll didn't exist and the human race had to do without it. Today's kids can't imagine that there was ever a time before it. Even in the '60s you had to go find it. It was not omnipresent. But after a certain point it became how you measured your life: song lyrics, riffs. You'd cross the street and think, 'Break on through to the other side' or whatever. But if you didn't work at it, you could go for many days without hearing

"Somewhere by 1980, maybe? You got a situation I call 'Rocksurround,' where you couldn't get away from

"That's about the time MTV came on," I suggest.

"Even the volume on people's car radios multiplied incrementally," he adds. "It was used in commercials. It got so where you couldn't shut it off. For myself, I would welcome silence over that condition. Silence would be more of a rock and roll mode than rocksurround."

I agree and tell him, "Okay, I'm old. My opinion about rock and roll shouldn't matter. My job should now be to just get out of the

"My opinion about that,"

he says, "is that at one time there were no rock writers either. Even after there were, newspapers didn't have rock writers. There were rock mags, but it was a long time before the New York Times or the L.A. Times had their first rock review. And why did they have a second? Because they discovered they could get ads. By 1970 every [major] paper had a staff of rock writers. It got to where you had a food tube stretching from the industry to the writers. Now I get these stupid letters about my column ["Of Note"] asking me why I'm not covering the music, and I'm, like, 'Cover it yourself. Why would you want it covered?"

"Yeah." I'm laughing. "I always read your thing just to see in what insane way you're going to get out of writing about what may be the next Black Oak Arkansas or whatever."

"To spill the beans." He's laughing too. "I guess what I'm doing is — I feel too many millions of words have been written about what the music is. I guess it's time to start writing about what the music isn't."

This leads to a discussion of a section in A Whore Just Like the Rest where the New York Dolls are playing at a party for Mercury Records in the early '70s, just as that record company was flushing itself into oblivion. Meltzer and Nick Tosches are the only writers who bother to show up at this sad affair, and Meltzer starts flinging macaroni salad at David Johansen's leather pants. A kid who hung with the New York band the Dictators jumps onstage to boogie down with the Dolls in a '60s-style/tribal/communal rave, a kind of we're all in this together/it's us against them/let's erase the space between the stage and the audience! attitude the Dolls were pantomiming if not inviting — and they kicked the crap out of him.

"Hey," I ask Meltzer, "do you remember, about that time, the Dolls were on public-access cable in Manhattan almost 24 hours a day?"

"Yeah," he goes. "They were playing at the old Mercer Arts Center until the place collapsed."

Ah, good times.

"A lot of readers really hate you," I point out to him, as if he doesn't already know

"Yeah, well, a lot of people want writers to behave with authority. They want to be led by the nose. And when they're not, it annoys

"was Robert Christgau [at the Village Voice]. I remember thinking, What the fuck? The guy couldn't be more deliberately obtuse, I thought. It was, Jesus, man! Lighten up, you're writing about rock and roll."

Meltzer worked under/ with/around Christgau and treats his relationship with him and the Village Voice in his book. "He and Greil Marcus regarded each other as the bee's knees."

I ask him about Marcus, and Meltzer calls him "a square." He then goes on to tell me a story about him and Tosches going over to Marcus's house, where the only thing to drink besides Miller High Life was Carnaby Street gin from a bottle that had been left topless on a shelf for years, rendering the stuff into little more than alcohol-free perfume — presumably with a protective layer of bug flotsam.

"I'm sure Nick and I were too pissed off to be sociable, so I don't remember talking to Greil at that event."

"People are going to want to know, what's the deal with Meltzer?" I then go on to list some of the adjectives I've heard applied to him, like wise-ass, rakehell, and obdurate

"Well, I've been all of those things. I've been intentionally obtuse, I've been clear as day, I've been a trickster and a mischief-maker..."

"A gunslinger, a surfer, and a hoodoo man..."

"Yeah, but most of these pieces are pretty direct."

"It's funny to me that people have so much trouble with it."

"It's funny to me too." Hating Richard Meltzer, I figure, serves a direct function: whatever it is that pisses you off should be a fairly accurate indicator of your own cultural prejudices.

Meltzer ends his book with a poem that first appeared in this paper. Part of it reads:

> "I'm too, too generous. Don't take me seriously.

No more seriously than your life. Don't tread on me. Correct me if I'm wrong. School is out..."■

#### **Global Warming** In a Nutshell

#### Clues from the Polar Ice Sheets

t's like trying to talk to someone who has a drinking problem: They don't want to hear what you have to say. Americans are kind of in denial about global warming," says Jeff Severinghaus, professor of geosciences at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

"Charles Keeling [for whom the Keeling curve — the graph that tracks the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere over time — was named | started measuring [carbon dioxide] in 1958. His work showed beyond a shadow of a doubt that humans were causing CO<sub>2</sub> to increase."

#### LOCAL **EVENTS**

Carbon dioxide, Severinghaus explains, is a "heattrapping gas" — the higher the concentration of this gas in

the air, the warmer Earth will be, "and that's global warming in a nutshell."

On Monday, January 14, Severinghaus will give a lecture at the Birch Aquarium at Scripps detailing his research of gas bubbles trapped in polar ice sheets. "Not to be confused with 'sea ice' — which is a thin layer of ice that is only about six feet thick and made from frozen sea water — 'polar ice sheets' are the big masses of ice on Antarctica and Greenland. There's only two of them," he says.

Polar ice sheets "form from snow falling on land and then being compacted." An ice-core drill is used to extract cylinders of ice ten feet long and five inches in diameter. Once removed from the ground the sections are pieced together to form one long cylinder, the longest of which is 3.6 kilometers, or little more than two miles long —

the depth from the surface to bedrock.

"Because the snow never melts in the polar regions, it just falls and piles up. Every year is preserved as a layer. Like the rings on a tree, you can actually see the layers, count them, and [obtain] an accurate age of the ice." Using the layers, which are each about an inch thick, scientists can count back as far as 40,000 years. "Beyond that, you have to use more indirect techniques for dating core, like radiometric dating.'

The ice cores, Severinghaus says, are "samples of ancient atmosphere." For 10,000 years the concentration of carbon dioxide in the air, measured in parts per million, has maintained a slow and steady climb. During the ice ages, the gas was at 200 parts per million. It took 5000 years for it to reach a level of 280. Then, "in the past 150 years, it jumped from 280 to 380.

Severinghaus says the burning of fossil fuels caused the sharp increase and that the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is now rising two parts per million per year. "Next year it's going to be 382, and the year after that 384, and it's also accelerating because economies like China and India are really coming online right now and beginning to adopt our lifestyle."

In a crowded elevator, "just from people exhaling," Severinghaus explains, carbon dioxide reaches 1000 parts per million. "To actually be harmed by CO<sub>2</sub>, you have to get up to 10,000 parts per million, at which point it makes you sort of sleepy." Only in extreme cases can carbon dioxide kill, as in the instance of Lake Nyos, located in the West African country of Cameroon, in 1986. "The lake turned over all of a sudden, meaning the bottom of the lake comes

up to the top — most lakes do this every winter, because cold water is denser than warm water, so the cold water sinks. This is one of those lakes where that doesn't happen — the water is stagnant down at the bottom, and the CO<sub>2</sub> had been building up there for hundreds of years, and then the whole thing turned over all at once and the [gas] came boiling out." The cloud of carbon dioxide flowed into nearby villages, asphyxiating at least 1700 people and thousands of animals.

Aside from freak incidents like Lake Nyos, Severinghaus admits that carbon dioxide poses no threat to humans. So why be concerned about the gas warming the air? "People don't really care if the temperature goes up five degrees. But the rain belts would move [toward the poles], which means places that today are a little on the dry side are going to get even dryer, and places on the wet side are going to get wetter. It's not necessarily a bad thing. Heating bills will be lower for people who live in cold places, and the Russians are happy

because they'll be able to grow wheat in northern Russia. But," Severinghaus continues, "because so much of the population lives in warmer, dryer regions already, the negative impacts are going to vastly outweigh the positive.'

The impact will be felt hardest among the world's poor. "We are able to adapt, because we can desalinate the ocean or buy a bottle of water," says Severinghaus, "but the people in Bangladesh are going to have a harder time.'



#### **OUTDOORS**

**Recent Chilly Days and Nights** confirm that San Diego's lowest temperatures (according to more than a century of weather records) tend to occur during the month of January. January's mean temperature at Lindbergh Field is about 55 degrees Fahrenheit. (July's mean is a balmy 70 degrees.) To experience much colder temperatures, journey to the Cuyamacas; -1 and -4 degree readings were once recorded there the two lowest temperatures ever recorded in the county.

The Fabled "Green Flash" at sunset or sunrise can sometimes be seen on crystal-clear days in January. At the instant the sun's upper rim is last visible at sunset, and also at the instant when it is first seen at sunrise, a flash of emerald-green color may be observed, especially on a flat horizon.

Physicists explain this peculiar phenomenon as due to color-dispersion (as in a prism) and scattering of sunlight through the Earth's atmosphere. Binoculars (or a small telescope) are helpful in spotting it. For green-flash hunting at sunset, any site with a view of the ocean horizon suffices. For the sunrise green flash, any spot overlooking the low desert (Sunrise Highway in the Laguna Mountains, for example) is good.

The Red Planet Mars continues to shine brightly with a steady light in the eastern sky after dusk. It reached opposition with the sun (180 degrees away from the sun) on December 24, 2007, and will be gradually receding from the Earth (and dimming in brightness) over the next several months.

**Venus** continues blazing bright in the east as a brilliant "morning star" visible from early dawn until sunrise. By early March, however,

Venus will be slipping into the sun's glare. By late March, it will no longer be easily observable. In July, Venus will emerge again as a bright "evening star" visible in the west after sunset. Venus's eveningstar stint will continue through fall and winter of this year.

The Latest Sunrise of the year (on standard, not daylight time) occurs Thursday, January 10, near 6:52 a.m. for most of metropolitan San Diego. Slowly at first, then more rapidly in the weeks to come, sunrise will arrive earlier with each passing day. By March 20, the sun will be rising a full hour earlier than it does now. The earlier sunrises are mostly a consequence of the sun's apparent movement from the southern sky toward the northern sky from December to June. You can keep track of that movement by noting where the sun rises (or sets) over a period of many weeks from a fixed vantage point, such as your home.







#### What are you reading?

"Keeping Faith, by Jodi Picoult."
Tell me about it.

"It's about a lady who is getting a divorce, and she's trying to keep her daughter. The daughter has an imaginary friend, and she's actually starting to see spirits. But the mom isn't believing it because they just were never very religious."

## What do you make of the plot and the writing?

"Picoult gives a lot of detail — she'll talk about how people are clothed or the way a blanket is draped. But not to the point where you just get bored and lost. It's very easy reading. She's good at tying everything together, making you understand where you are at throughout the book."

"Probably the daughter, Faith. She's struggling with her mom, who is definitely having problems with the divorce, and isn't paying much attention to Faith. She doesn't understand why her mom won't love her. She's well written; she has the personality and

beliefs of a child, and she puts all of her trust in this imaginary friend, who is full of purity and innocence."

#### Do you have a favorite passage?

"Mom finds the little girl, Faith, climbing on top of her swing set. Mom asks, 'Why are you doing that?' And Faith says, 'My friend told me to do it.' That's the beginning of her imaginary friend, and you're kind of drawn into it."

Compare this with other books

## you've read. What sort of books do you like?

"Books that have situations that could for sure happen in real life. I was reading Jennifer Weiner's books for a while; they're very similar to Picoult's. They tell about female lives in a realistic way — but with a little bit more drama than my life has. I like to be able to relate to a character. Also, I rarely get time to read, so when I do, I don't want

it to take too much concentration. I just want to sit down and enjoy reading it."

What book has been most life-

#### changing for you?

"Honestly? The Bible. Growing up, in church, they would refer to passages to get you through everyday situations. It's something that I'm always going to have with me. I go back and forth on reading it and not reading it, but it always holds meaning for me."

#### Do you have a favorite author?

"Right now, it's Jennifer Weiner. I've read four of her books, and loved them all. They're about different women in different cities with different lifestyles. The most recent was *Goodnight Nobody*. That was about a woman who moves from New York City to Connecticut — she's settling down into the suburbs, becoming a housewife. Another woman in the neighborhood gets killed, and it becomes

the main character's hobby to try to figure out who the murderer is. The book was funny, sad, and suspenseful."

### What magazines or newspapers do you read?

"I read the *Union-Tribune* and *Peo-*ple and the gossip magazines. In the *Union-Tribune*, I probably read only
one article to the end, or do the crossword puzzle. In *People*, I like to look at
the pictures — I'll read it, but only every
now and then."

### Do you talk to your friends about reading?

"I have a good friend at work. She has very different tastes in books, but we talk about what we're reading. She was recently reading a book on psychology — sensing and understanding. She reads more intellectual things than I do, but I like it because she introduces me to different ideas."





#### A GUIDE TO UNEXPECTED SAN DIEGO AND BEYOND I BY JERRY SCHAD

ROAM-()-RAMA

he triple set of waterfalls dubbed the "Three Sisters" is an amazing San Diego County feature not many have seen. In full flood, these cascades put on a show reminiscent of Yosemite's show stoppers — except at a reduced scale. Since some of the upstream drainage of Boulder Creek comes from Cuyamaca Reservoir, regulated releases of water there can greatly affect the volume of water flowing over the falls.

Although the round-trip hike measures only four miles from the nearest road, visiting the falls is a task for expert hikers, not beginners. Take along drinking water, and be prepared for some strenuous climbing, both up and down, on marginal

pathways and on no trail at all near the falls themselves.

To get to the trailhead from San Diego, exit Interstate 8 at Highway 79 (Descanso exit) and drive north. After 1.3 miles turn left on Riverside Drive. Continue 0.6 mile to the main crossroads (post office, etc.) of the hamlet of Descanso. From there take Oak Grove Drive 1.6 miles to the intersection of Boulder Creek

Road on the right. Follow Boulder Creek Road north for 13.0 miles (first half paved, then dirt) to a hairpin turn where unpaved Cedar Creek Road

and falls lie in Cleveland National Forest territory). On foot now, follow the remains of an old ranch road (not Cedar Creek Road) due west for 0.7 mile to a saddle, where an old mining road on the left slants southeast and descends into Sheep Camp Creek. You can both see and hear the falls from this saddle

joins from the west. Park there, taking care not to block traffic, and

post a National Forest Adventure Pass on your car (the parking area

Descend southwest on the mining road for 0.4 mile, cross Sheep Camp Creek, and switch back onto a narrow path cut into the south slope. After about 0.3 mile, the trail veers sharply left and passes over a saddle in the divide between Sheep Camp Creek and Boulder Creek.

Next, you negotiate an abrupt drop of 500 vertical feet through chaparral on a primitive — and in places excessively steep and slippery — trail cut by hikers' footsteps. At the bottom you can either forge a route through the brush and angular rocks along the left side of the creek or (if the water level is not too high) rock hop and wade toward the falls. Great masses of poison oak, intermixed with wild grape vines, lie along the banks. Be very cautious of slippery rocks.

When you reach the base of the waterfalls, all the previous thrashing about will have been worth it. The "middle sister" is impressive, with water sliding 50 feet down a smooth channel worn in the bedrock into a kidney shaped pool about 80 feet long and at least 10 feet deep. Watch your  $footing -- it's \ deceptively\\$ easy to slip on the smooth rock and perhaps be seriously injured. It's difficult and dangerous to climb up to the uppermost waterfall, though some agile climbers have done it.







of" or live albums),
Tempchin earned songwriter

royalties. The Eagles' *Their Greatest Hits 1971–1975* sold 27 million copies, making it one of the ten best-selling albums ever, according to the Recording Industry Association of America.

Last year, the Eagles used two of his songs, "Somebody" and "It's Your World Now," for Long Road Out of Eden, their first studio album in 28 years. The record debuted at number one on Billboard's Top 200 album chart when it was released in November.

Tempchin says the legal protections for songwriters have made him a good living.

"It's been a bonanza over and over and over again." Six years ago, he and **Sloppy Seconds** Last month, the online "Pacific Songwriting Competition" named local Michael Tiernan "2007 Songwriter of the Year" after he briefly was

With the arrival of the digital music free-for-all, Tempchin now wonders if the bonanza is over.

"A lot of people believe that the creators of music don't need to be paid anymore.... If people are downloading albums for free, no one is getting paid.... Through most of my life, the copyright laws were working and songwriters were getting paid. But now that's all changing."

Jack Tempchin distributes his latest solo album *Songs* through *tempchin.com*. He appears every Tuesday with his band Rocket Science at the Calypso in Leucadia.





Blue Money Drummer Freddie Fontaine once spent six months touring with the Blue Man Group.

"I was with the band; I wasn't a Blue Man," says the longtime local wedding-band vet. "It was still a difficult audition, though. On tour, the band is part of the stage show too, so there's a lot of theatrics involved....

"You're playing with other drummers and percussionists all at once...not many drummers have that kind of experience. They [Blue Man] teach you to exaggerate all your rockand-roll moves, like the synchronous head bob, the [drum stick] spins and twirls, the one-handed audience wave."

Fontaine says the tour gig paid around \$500 a week.

"Which wasn't bad, especially when you consider benefits and per diems and stuff.'

Musicians at fixedlocation Blue Man theaters reportedly earn more than tour players.

That's a really hard gig to get into. It's at least \$1000 a week, but nobody ever quits. I told them I was willing to move to Las Vegas or Boston.... Even after doing the tour for them, I couldn't get in. Plus there's a big union controversy about working the [fixed locale] Blue Man shows, even for the musicians. I didn't want to join another union.'

Fontaine considered

auditioning as an actual Blue

"I saw they make twice as much as the highest-paid [musicians]. But then I discovered that I'm probably allergic to the makeup."

The Blue Man Group appears tomorrow, January 11, at the Sports Arena.







It would be a mistake for history to remember L.A. Guns only for the temporary merge with Hollywood Rose that spawned the first official lineup of Guns N' Roses. During the last great hard-rock era on the West Coast, L.A. Guns released albums that stand out as brilliant souvenirs of the format called sleaze rock by the music press. The band's second album. Cocked and Loaded, led a pack of riff-raff that included the Crüe, Ratt, Poison, Hanoi Rocks, Faster Pussycat, and a host of less-memorable hard rockers. At their best, L.A. Guns were the hottest opening act around, blasting greasy sex, dope. and rock-and-roll anthems from the grandiose touring stages of Def Leppard

and AC/DC. If there is a problem with L.A. Guns today, it is that there are two bands recording and touring under the name L.A. Guns.

In fairness, both bands contain some original members, if you consider that the lineup has been in a near-constant state of flux since **Tracii Guns** founded the original version while in high school. The two bands came about when Tracii left to form Brides of Destruction. Front man Phil Lewis hired a replace-

ment named Stacey Blades, and L.A. Guns survived. But when the Brides project flat-lined, Tracii rounded up alumni **Paul Black** and **Chad Stewart** (this version, with **Jeremy Guns** on bass, is the one that will play San Diego) and began to appear in public as L.A. Guns.

The L.A. Guns with Blades is a snarling riff machine in the way of Guns N' Roses. Yet



Tracii Guns, never a particularly gifted guitarist, adds a skanky quality to his music that harkens back to the disorderly bandstands of the Sunset Strip during the mid-'80s. I, for one, am glad that there are bands still willing to go there.



The Electric Prunes are best known for their 1966 hit "I Had Too Much to Dream (Last Night)," a great song and a fantastic example of psychedelia kitsch. With its backwardsplaying guitars and unusual echo effects not to mention its wink-nudge drug references — it's practically a template for much of the rock 'n' roll that would follow it for the next year or two. The follow-up single, "Get Me to the World on Time," is good, too. It should be: Like most of the Prunes' songs on their first album, it was written by professional songwriters Annette Tucker and Nancie Mantz, and some of the instruments on the recording were reportedly played by producer Dave Hassinger.

To be fair, the guys in the band did apparently play the majority of their parts, they played live, and they wrote more of their own material later on. A notable exception would be the Prunes' final studio album, Mass in F Minor, which was a concept album that set Latin prayers to a combination of Gregorian chant and psychedelic rock. You can't make this stuff up! A single from the album, "Kyrie Eleison, ended up on the soundtrack to Easy Rider.

But I think my personal favorite Electric Prunes recording is a radio commercial for the Vox wah-wah pedal in which an overexcited announcer exhorts the band to "Play it. Prunes, first without the wah-wah pedal! Now listen to the difference when you push that Vox wah-wah pedal down!" It would be cool if the reunited Prunes tracked down that guy and took him on tour.







Man, can Jenn Grinels sing! Her sultry voice growls at the hot, slow parts in song one, "Misery," and it rings out like gold in the quick-paced and heartfelt track three, "No Better." The album is all sweet acoustic tracks, and even in that simple form she makes each song interesting, using deft transitions between the highest and lowest notes of her considerable range.

The songwriting is pretty good, too. Grinels avoids the cliché trappings of her genre – acoustic love and breakup songs - and she embraces genuine, original lyrics without the smartypants overtones or anger of her indiegirl-group contemporaries. She is the real, talented epitome of today's best indie



Grinel's music would be perfect to me if she had a little more indignation and animal aggression. With that, I think she could hang with Johnette Napolitano.



## **Blared and Brayed** and Tweaked

Two of the year's best performances crept up on no one.

■HE YEAR IN REVIEW: PLAYS AND PRODUCTIONS. Last year, several shows arrived ballyhoo-first. Pre-opening-night accolades promised "Broadway bound" quality and SRO houses both here and

in New York. Some of them, however, were a letdown, like the La Jolla Playhouse's Cry-Baby, which promised John Waters's critique of all things ap-

ple pie but gave us Donnie and Marie in Dixie Peach pomade. Others were a fright: the Playhouse's Carmen blared and brayed and tweaked every moment: Cirque du Overthetop. Both productions did commercial takes on their material. Do they signal a trend at the Playhouse, erstwhile showcase of Peter Sellars and Robert Woodruff?

As disturbing was the Old Globe's watereddown Measure for Measure. You could hear director Paul Mullins thinking, "Problem play? No prob." He cookie-cut the script as a comedy, paring away (sometimes mocking) anything that threatened a tidy, crowd-pleaser ending. This was Shakespeare for people who don't like Shakespeare.

Some of 2007's most memorable shows began quietly, even humbly, then crept up on

Cygnet Theatre opened 2007 with Dael Orlandersmith's haunting Yellowman, which takes a dream-destroying look at "internal racism" among African Americans. Monique Gaffney and Mark Broadnax played "dark-skinned"

Alma and "high yellow" Eugene (and several others) in a slow dance of separation, as prejudices tore them apart.

The production's nonverbal theatricality was so eloquent it was as if the playwright attended every rehearsal, encouraging the actors to stress subtexts and key moments with revealing gestures and movements. Truth is: except for a single line about a bare stage and two chairs that should sit far apart, the script has no stage directions. On the page it's mostly monologues. Director Esther Emery and her cast and crew invented everything between the lines and crafted one of 2007's most creative, moving productions.

Another surprise: Harvey Fierstein's Catered Affair, at the Old Globe, came with the "Broadway bound" fanfare of a new musical. But instead of revving up the audience with a hot opening number, several women entered, casually singing "la...la..." as if warming up. It felt like being backstage, behind the scenes of



a musical, and, it turned out, that's what Fierstein had in mind.

A "play with music," and not a musical, Catered avoided externals (it's almost as minimalist as Our Town) and dove deep into the lives of a lower-middle-class Bronx family. A simple "I do" unpacked decades of repressed feelings — repressed 1950s feelings at that. At first the premise looked unpromising. But the production relentlessly grounded itself in emotional truth, and the results were as wonderful as unexpected. Someone called it "Arthur Miller set to music.'





Last year saw some fine directorial work: Esther Emery for Yellowman and Communicating Doors at Cygnet; Kristianne Kurner's buoyant Sailor's Song at New Village Arts; Frank Galati's after the quake and Dominique Serrand's Deception at La Jolla Playhouse. But John Doyle's direction of Catered stands as foremost among equals. His behind-the-scenes approach turned the musical genre inside out.

He built many scenes with silence (even fought for them, it sometimes felt, against the audience's wishes). The most unforgettable: Faith Prince's Aggie, the mother slowly com-

ing apart, reaches the condition Wordsworth wrote about, where thoughts lie "too deep for tears." What does she do? Nothing. She just sits, unable to proceed. In effect, Doyle devised a literal showstopper: absolute silence. Finally, when Aggie can, she rises, crosses the stage, and walks up a fire escape. She just needed that time alone. There was nothing she, or we, could do to help her along. In these days of antsy, frame-by-frame stage business, Doyle took a huge risk in doing nothing and fashioned the most eloquent theatrical moment in

Catered will open in New York sometime this year. Most oddsmakers don't give the unsplashy, nondeliberately

ingratiating production much of a chance. Well, if it doesn't enjoy a healthy run, I for one will think less of Broadway.

The show that *really* snuck up on people was New Village Arts's Sailor's Song. As written, John Patrick Shanley's comedy-drama, about making fundamental choices, does your thinking for you ("just do it," his characters urge Rich, the commitment-fearing protagonist, as if in an extended Nike commercial). But the staging, directed by Kristianne Kurner and choreographed by Robin Krist, often leapt in an instant from pale, pimply old reality to the wisp and fluidity of dreams.

The music ranged from Strauss's "Blue Danube" to Otis Redding's "Try a Little Tenderness" (the latter for a Dance of Death). Somehow, Manny Fernandes, who played Rich, rowed a boat across the stage and then, as if to show off, did some fancy spins and curlicues — without effort; even, it seemed, without gimmicks. Magic.



More good news: last year, San Diego Black Ensemble Theatre and Cygnet Theatre offered possibly the most popular series of staged readings in local theater history: The August Wilson Cycle. Several times, the off-night series had to turn away patrons — for a staged reading, mind you, without set, props, or cos-

tumes. Wilson's words have that much appeal.

One of last year's reads, Fences, will receive a full production at Cygnet beginning January 26. The companies recently announced they'll continue the series in 2008 with Wilson's Jitney, Two Trains Running, King Hedley II, and Ma Rainey's Black

Two of the year's best performances crept up on no one. And in both cases the actors avoided what may be the biggest trap of all: clue the audience that, while your character may be an elitist snob, or a mean-spirited drunk, or a reeker of evil, you, the cuddly, lovable, wondrous human being playing the role, are certainly none of these things.

When they walked onstage in W;t at the North Coast Rep, and in St. Nicholas at Cygnet, Rosina Reynolds and Ron Choularton left all traces of themselves in the wings. Reynolds played a rigid, control-freak scholar, dying of cancer, and Choularton a blood-sucking theater critic, who cavorts with vampires, unforgettably. ■







# **Eating Rite**

This is how far we've come: An affordable new neighborhood eatery, warm and pretty but unpretentious, serving humanely raised natural Niman meats, precious Jidori chicken, local organic veggies in thoroughly tasty simple dishes am I back in San Francisco, or have I landed in Hog Heaven?

Ritual Tavern is closely linked to the nearby Linkery, that staunch purveyor of ethical food culture a few blocks south. Mike Flores, who owns Ritual with his wife Staci Wilkins, is a Linkery 'graduate," and so is chef Glenn Farrington. They've carried their culinary idealism across University Avenue to the north side of 30th Street, to the site of a former Greek-Mexican eatery called Mailo's.

The space has been thoroughly renovated to look like an Old World pub. One room of the Ritual houses an attractive bar. Next to it — but happily separate, in case the bar gets noisy, as bars may do — is an attractive, publike dining room with a bare floor, a dark green wall or two, darkstained wooden accents, and well-spaced tables topped with white cloths. Soft, spacey rock was playing on the sound system when I arrived; later, it was replaced by bebop, still played softly. The staff believe that conversation is an integral part of a civilized dinner. Ah, Grownupville.

I ate there during the week between Christmas and New Year's, when the populations of San Diego and the Midwest switch places, so I couldn't bring my usual horde of hungry Vikings; all were scattered to the freezing regions to visit various Aged P's or grown children. Happily, my friend Marciela was still in town and looking for (culinary) adventure. As a duo we couldn't eat our way through the menu, but what we did eat told us we'd hit a winner on every front: food, atmosphere, comfort, price. The menu is short and looks deceptively simple, but what emerges is pleasure on a plate.

We began with a round of house onion rings, with an airy batter leavened by Ballast Point pale ale. The rings came with a remoulade dip — not mustardy-hot green New Orleans remoulade, but pink, mild, and rich. The same light batter robes a vegetable assortment and a shrimp appetizer if you fancy more fried food. We had to try the scampi (haven't had that for ages). Tender, sweet Gulf of Mexico shrimp floated in a dark, lemony broth, with toasted ciabatta from Sadie Rose Bakery along-

side for dipping. Marci and I tried to guess what the mysterious undertones were: Worcestershire, or maybe Thai fish sauce. Neither one, the chef told me later: "It's just the classic scampi recipe, with shallots, garlic, sherry, olive oil, and butter.' It tasted better and richer than that.

Entrée possibilities include a burger and fries (with house-made ketchup, sweetened with cane sugar instead of evil high-fructose corn

syrup), catfish and chips, pan-fried Jidori chicken breast with pineapple glaze, and a tempting shepherd's pie with a load of veggies that includes green beans and sweet, seductive parsnips. (There are vegan versions of several of these choices.) There are one or two specials every night as well.

I couldn't pass up the temptation to try "Saddlebrush Gumbo," so named because the chef is a Long Island Yankee cooking a Southern dish (see 'About the Chef' for details). As y'all probably know, I'm a strict constructionist when it comes to Creole or Cajun gumbo and can get testy about ersatz renditions — but this is not a Louisiana gumbo at all. To start, instead of the "Cajun trinity" of green peppers, celery, and onions, the chef uses carrots — carrots in gumbo! Second, it isn't really a soup, more a thick étouffée ("smothered" dish). Then, too, there's neither okra nor filé in it.

But gumbo isn't restricted to Louisiana — it's common throughout the South, from the Carolinas to Texas, with a number of regional variations.

When I spoke to the chef, I asked what color he made his roux, to get a hint of what he was doing with the dish and where it might have come from: It's a golden roux,

he told me, made with bacon fat and flour, lighter in color than Louisiana's typical range of peanut butter to mahogany. That alone points to origins in Alabama, or more likely Florida. The carrots? Here's my theory: Florida's zillions of retired New Yorkers (including many of my relatives) have never eaten okra in their lives — but carrots they know and love. So perhaps this recipe stems from the southeast Florida culinary region that runs from Century Village (where an alligator once slithered out of a canal and ate somebody's grandson) to South Miami Beach. Jewish Mother Gumbo, maybe?

By any name, it's wonderfully good eating a thick, full-flavored sauce robing Mexican shrimp, Niman's semi-spicy andouille sausage, and rea-

sonably tender Jidori chicken breast, with a delicious, wholesome backbeat from organic long-grain wild rice, instead of the sticky white stuff.

The highest-priced item (\$20) is a lamb sirloin with a rosemary-Port reduction sauce. It arrived cooked to a perfect medium-rare and came with potato goat cheese dumplings" (that is, gourmet Tater Tots) and fresh, simple spinach from Crow's Pass Farms in Temecula. Marci and I agreed: It's a charming dish we'd gladly cook for ourselves if only we could get this quality of lamb at our local Vons (fat chance).

Most of the dishes are designed to go well with the awesome beer list. There are only a dozen-odd wines (the short list of whites could use some bolstering), and they change frequently, but the sweet

and charming servers and bartender can help you come up with the right pour for whatever vou're eating.

For dessert, we were tempted by the artisan cheese board but. feeling full, succumbed instead to the house bread pudding. It's soft, sturdy, and flavorful, loaded with raisins and glazed with a sugar syrup dusted with mace and nutmeg. You can get it topped with all-natural gelato if you like. (Minus gelato, any leftovers make a grand breakfast.) Beer lovers may want to try the outrageous-sounding Stone Smoked Porter Shake — an icecream "soda" of vanilla gelato in dark beer. The Caffé Calabria organic French-press coffee is rich and fine, including the decaf.

Googling the Ritual, I encountered one review that remarked that the place seemed less ambitious than the nearby and somewhat similar Jayne's Gastropub (a younger, scenier, excruciatingly louder take on a British "local"). In some ways, that's true — Jayne's ventures

more widely into international dishes, especially in its appetizers, whereas Ritual's more limited, concentrated menu cleaves closer to updates of oldstyle pub grub. But talking over the comparison, Marci and I decided that Ritual's ambitions are simply different, and higher in some ways: They have more to do with consistent quality and careful cooking than the length or breadth of the menu. Having eaten at both, we enjoyed Ritual's food better, and trusted the chef more. (And we certainly preferred the quiet ambience that let us gossip to our heart's content.) If you live nearby and prefer an atmosphere that favors civilized discourse over a perpetual party vibe, this cozy tavern could easily become your hangout — your new weekly ritual.

#### **ABOUT THE CHEF**

The story is familiar: Chef Glenn Farrington came from a family with many generations of food pros behind him — his greatgrandmother was a private chef

at an estate on Long Island's deluxe North Shore, and his ancestors in Ireland had often done the same (though in those days they were called "cooks"). As a teenager, he started out dishwashing in a neighborhood eatery and realized swiftly that restaurants were his natural environment

He moved to San Diego 14 years ago. "The North Shore of Long Island wasn't working for me. It's remote from everything, and I just couldn't see staying there and buying a house I couldn't afford and having a bunch of kiddies to drive me crazy," he says. "So I moved to Mission Beach, became a surfer, and lost my Long Island drawl." He worked many front-of-thehouse jobs at local restaurants. including Cafe Westgate and Trattoria Acqua, and gradually slipped into cooking, paying attention to what he saw in

restaurant kitchens and learnopened Ritual three months ago, moving there was a natural next



down south. The Yankees who moved back were called 'sada great-great-grandfather who was a general for the South, so it only seemed fitting.

"I did a lot of research on gumbo, because I've always understood gumbo to be real serious business. You've got to do it right or don't do it at all. And I found a lot of recipes with carrots. The authentic gumbo recipes — 150 different recipes — all varied. They all

had some kind of pork, chicken, seafood. So we decided to use andouille, Jidori chicken, and Gulf of Mexico shrimp, 'cause if you were from Louisiana, that's the kind of shrimp you'd get. And when I tried the carrots in it, we had some people from Louisiana, real hard-line, tasting it, and they said, 'Don't change a thing.

"My food philosophy is for us to use the best ingredients we can possibly find — especially with produce. It's really key to have extremely fresh produce and as much organic as we can muster. We get our meats shipped from Niman through a meat jobber in L.A. We're really strong believers in no hormones, etc. — as ethical in the animal-rearing processes as possible. It does cost more, but we manage — we don't want to compromise the integrity of our mission." ■



# **Organic Heaven**

It's just a damned sandwich, but the taste has me thinking like a wine connoisseur.

otta be careful here. To say something's the best. But...oh, to heck with it. This is the best freakin' sandwich I can remember munching, okay? It's enough to make a vegan out of me.

I'm in Silver Strand Plaza, where I.B. begins. Imperial Beach. Actually, I'm in a health-supplement store. Seacoast Vitamins and Herbs. Chaldean-Mexican-American family runs it. Well, the two daughters do. Frances, who's, like, 22, runs the store, and Vanessa - she's 26

started up this organic cafe inside the store last fall. And that's where I'm sitting, at one of the tables by the kitchen, facing a green bowl of lumpy golden soup and a plate with this hunk of vegan paradise on it, this bi-ig focaccia sandwich, loaded, beautiful to look at.

'You eat with your eyes first!" Vanessa said when she brought it over to me.

So true. The sandwich is cut diagonally, so you can see the archeological strata of everything they put in there. The creamy green of the wasabi mayo, strewn with parsley, the green lettuce, the white and green sprouts, the red slash of sun-dried tomatoes, the cream of mashed butternut squash, the purple-brown of the layer of roasted eggplant, oozing gold of caramelized sautéed onions, and more green wasabi mayo. You hate to wreck the thing, but man. What a taste! Truly, since it's vegan, I was expecting blah-on-blah, cardboard. Only reason I asked for this "Baby Greens" vegan sandwich (\$8.99) in the first place was to be spartan, one of the boys, seeing how this was a health store and all. Even though they have meat here too, like the "Chicago Way," roast beef with horseradish, and turkey (both, \$8.99), and some pretty interesting salads (like the \$9.99 lime-and-cilantro chicken salad, and the strawberry-and-spinach, \$8.99). There are even some delish-sounding vegetarian paninis I could have gone for, like the "Appallonia," with grilled apples, vegan "ba-

con" (or real bacon, if you want), cheddar, and red-onion mayo (\$7.99).

But no. Martyr complex, I guess. So I ordered this "Baby Greens," the most gutless-sounding sandwich of all.

The first taste of the garlic and the eggplant and the tomatoes and onions and squash...mixed with the focaccia...I can't tell you. I'm so surprised, I can hardly swallow. Sandy, lady at the table next door, sees my expression and asks, "You okay?"

"Uh, yes." I mean, not to go over the top. It's just a damned sandwich, but the taste has me thinking like a wine connoisseur. The textures, the marriage of rich and delicate flavors, the nice touch of caramelizing, the grippy, the slidey. Bold, earthy... For Vanessa, and for uncardboard-like vegan food, this looks like a very good year. To be really true to the wine-tasting comparison, I'd have to spit it out. But hey, no way.

Sandy's sipping the soup of the day, potato and leek (\$3.99). In a crazy moment, I order that too. It's a thick, tongue-caressing spuddyleeky treat. Lots of other stuff in there, carrots, celery, garlic. Can taste bay leaf and white wine. Imagine! Here, surrounded by vitamin pills, we're into gourmet.

Turns out Vanessa has been a precocious foodie since forever. She had to wait till she was 12 before her dad let her start making sandwiches in their liquor store-deli in Lakeside. "I experimented on the customers all the time,"

she says. Finally, her mom Gladys (who's bustling around the place too) and dad sent her to Italy, to the Leonardo da Vinci Culinary Academy in Florence. Cordon Bleu. "Everybody ate rich, but good, organic foods over there,' Vanessa says, "yet they stayed thin. It's because they carry things, they walk everywhere! We've got a long way to go here."

Many of the cafe's customers have problems, like diabetes, liver problems, gluten intolerance, and Vanessa cooks to accommodate them all.

I ask her how come this sandwich is so tastv. She says she tries to buy seasonally, local, organic. "But there are rules," she says. "You eat with your eyes first," she says. "That's important. A sandwich has got to have colors. And height. Lots of stuff inside. The bread: Got to be interesting. And above all, a sandwich must have flavor. Vegan doesn't have to be tasteless! And, God first. I pray over every dish I make. 'He' makes them.

Then she's back in the kitchen. I look around. It's bright out here. The walls are sky-blue, light green, and gold, and a black marble counter angles across the back corner. There's some pretty good art on the back wall, by a local artist.

But the thing I notice most is how when people come in, they kind of let out a big breath. They take things off. They sit down, like this is where they can let it all hang out. Sanctuary. Like Teresa, who's diabetic. She sits at the table next to mine and also orders the soup. She says Frances has saved her with the liver detox supplements she's given her.

We're all talking. And damn. If I'd held back on the soup, I would've had enough change to



try one of the organic apple strudels (\$2.99) or the chocolate brownies, vegan, zero-gluten.

I pay up. "So where's your dad?" I ask

"Iraq," she says. "He's Iraqi Chaldean. He's over there doing intelligence work. He's been there four, five years. But when he comes back, he'll be pretty proud when he sees what Frances and I have done with this cafe." ■

# **No Perfect Closure**

"Mr. and Mrs. Average Consumer still perceive cork to be associated with more premium wines."

ost of the cork industry is essentially in denial," says Michael Friedman, CEO for Oneo Closures North America. "It's done a few things to try to resolve the issues but never really approached

it from a truly scientific point of view. They've simply said, 'We've been doing it this way for years; let's just do it better.

The issue, of course, is TCA: trichloroanisole, the compound responsible for producing corked wines. At worst, a corked wine will smell a lot like wet card-

board. At best, it may simply flatten a wine's flavor profile — mute it, muddy it. Either way, the wine business loses. "We've run some consumer research," says Friedman, "and one of the things we've found is that some consumers don't really know what a flawed wine tastes like. When they taste TCA, they don't know it's TCA; they just know they don't like it. They'll think, 'I got a bad bottle,' or 'This is oxidized,' or 'I don't like this sort of wine.' Then they close the bottle and never come back. You may have even lost a consumer for wine in general.

My trusty Oxford Companion to Wine notes that "the problem of corkiness was perceived by the wine industry to have increased during the 1980s, at the end of which estimates of the proportion of corked wine bottles varied from less

than two percent to more than five percent of the total." (And these days, you can find voices in the industry that will go as high as nine percent.) The tentative tone of "was perceived...to have increased" is understandable. Did corki-

ness rise, or did the wine community just get more savvy? And if corkiness did rise in the 80s, why then?


Friedman was around in those days, working in the corporate wine world, and he is similarly hesitant to pronounce on the matter. "I've done a lot of

reading about this, and it's very hard for me to get an absolute answer. The history says that it's always been around, and I've got to believe that it has. Chlorine is a naturally occurring thing," and chlorine is one of the things that makes TCA possible. Briefly: chlorine reacts with phenolics in the cork to form trichlorophenol. Trichlorophenol then gets converted to chloroanisoles by molds growing on the cork, and there you have it.

'So get rid of the mold," you reply. "Disinfect the cork." Which is exactly what the cork industry thought, decades ago. "In the '60s and '70s and '80s," explains Friedman, "people used chlorine to sterilize corks and cork equipment. Which is, of course, the last thing you want to use. I'll speculate and say that the use of chlo-

rine was probably something that accelerated the prominence of TCA and may have actually increased the levels." Still, he says, "I think there are a lot of different faults, different causes for the increased predominance of TCA." (For one thing, cork producers weren't the only ones misguidedly using chlorine as a cleaner. Says Friedman, "There are wineries that have been literally rebuilt because the beams and floors were affected by TCA.")

Again, Friedman is hesitant to judge, but he is willing to make a few observations. The first has to do with quality control in the cork industry. "Way back in the mid-'80s, I used to work for a very high-volume, very low-end sparkling wine producer. We made a decision to switch from plastic stoppers to natural corkwe're talking a few hundred million corks, which is a fairly significant impact on the market and we were told, 'No problem, no big deal.' All of a sudden, when we entered the marketplace, the price of cork went up. That said to me, 'Uhoh, we've got a tight supply. There's a fine balance between supply and demand for cork.' Since then, I've heard from all the people in the traditional cork industry, saying, 'No, it's not a function of us supplying a lower grade of cork just to keep up with demand.'" (A lower grade of cork, it might be supposed, would be more likely to contain fissures and crevices, places for moisture to collect and mold to grow.) "I don't know the real answer, but it certainly looks like the wine industry's demand for corkfinished wines grew at a pace that was faster than the cork industry's ability to react with a high-quality product. And the kind of industrial control that would be associated with that may have fallen by the wayside for a period of time. That certainly looks to be a plausible




TCA, the compound that produces corked wines

explanation."

That brings us to the cork producers' decision to "simply do the same thing better." The cork industry, says Friedman, is now pitching "industrial control. That means following a product from its raw material all the way through production. Every single plank of cork bark is coded and followed all the way through the process. If they get a TCA-laden cork at the end of the process, they can trace it back. Their response was controlling the source, controlling the processing, making sure the cork was cleaned correctly." "Correctly" first meant using hydrogen peroxide instead of chlorine. Then, "in the late '80s/early '90s, a steam process was in-

vented. It had somewhere between 60 and 80 percent efficiency in removing TCA from cork. That's relatively effective, but we think it should be 100 percent."

Here, the progressive winedrinker will likely pipe up and say, "You know what's 100 percent TCA-free? A screw cap. Or, for that matter, a plastic cork." Oneo makes its own line of screw caps — though not for wines sold in the U.S. - so Friedman would probably grant the point. But he isn't ready to cede the argument. "We just think that, long term, it's not the right solution. First of all, it's not a renewable resource. Second, there's an environmental issue — mining boxite to make aluminum is hardly environmentally friendly.

Third, there's the question of aging. "Oxygen is both your enemy and your friend in the wine business. Over a long period of time, oxygen can destroy a wine. But the right amount of oxygen over the right amount of time is your friend. That's a major part of the aging process. If you talk to the aluminum screw cap manufacturers, you'll find that they have a problem — screw caps are a perfect closure. Mechanically, they shut down the bottle. It's a great closure if the wine is going to be consumed within, say, 12 to 18 months, and you're not worried about allowing long-term exposure to oxygen.

But if you want to go longer, things are less perfectly predictable. Right now, says Friedman, "Reductive issues are the big buzzword in the world of screw caps. A wine that's perfectly sealed under a screw cap over a period of time actually goes anaerobic. You end up with what people call a reductive character, a sort of rubbery, almost flinty character. It's temporary, and it blows off fairly quickly, but screw cap producers are working hard to find a liner that enables a small amount of oxygen permeation" — the way cork does. So far, "They have one liner that allows for some permeation, but the problem is, it's uncontrollable."

Finally, there's the image thing. Friedman is happy to admit that "there are people who are highly aware of wine, who are involved and are familiar with the benefits of screw caps and the place of plastic corks. But for the most part, Mr. and Mrs. Average Consumer still perceive cork to be associated with more premium wines. There are maybe six or seven studies that pretty much confirm that consumers still prefer cork. We all understand the problem," he says, his marketer's instincts warming to the subject, "and we all understand that the only solution is ultimately going to be to fix the problem with cork instead of with alternate closures. Plastic doesn't work; screw caps are imperfect. Cork is a great

product, and it works well when we process it right."

How to process it right?
The answer next week. ■

With a new name and renovated for an even better ocean view, the former George's at the Cove continues to serve Chef Trey Foshee's ambitious, healthful California cuisine based on prime, seasonal ingredients and emphasizing sustainable wild seafood, local produce naturally raised meats and poultry. The cooking style is a little lighter now, good for carb-counters, with only small amounts of starch on the entrées. The award-winning wine list offers few bot tles under \$50, but many by the halfbottle or glass, including serious dessert wines. Full bar, creative "chef cocktails" with fresh fruit. Wheelchair elevator available but hidden (ask valet parkers); disabled can use neighbor Pasquale's mens' room on same floor. Vegetarians and vegans accommodated to order. Reserve well ahead. Dinner nightly. Very expensive. NW

Hancock Street Café 3354 Hancock Street, Point Loma, 619-296-2060. If you spot Marilyn, Elvis, and Lady Liberty waving at you from the sidewalk, you're here. They are life-size fiberglass lookalikes, but Mario is real, and his restaurant is a living shrine to jazz pianist Herbie Hancock. Mario has pianos, guitars, and drums inside — even a little stage where you're often welcome to perform. The food? Italian home cooking. Mario is from New York and knows his pasta. You can usually expect a good-value special, like spaghetti and meatballs. Sometimes

he'll even throw in a bottle of red wine. Here among the little factories and auto shops of Loma Portal may be San Diego's most popping cultural phenomenon. Worth investigating, even if you just want to eat. Open daily, 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Jack's La Jolla 7863 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-8111. This sprawling glitzy restaurant has several venues serving steaks, seafood, sushi, and pub grub. In The Dining Room, the most formal and serious choice. Chef Tony De Salvio prepares a menu of refined seasonal California-French cuisine featuring highly creative combinations of luxury ingredients and local products full of unexpected touches, e.g., a duck breast pairs delightfully with cocoa nibs. When you move on to sweets, dessert chef Jack Fisher is one of the town's best and boldest. An interna-tional wine offers plenty by the glass, although bottles run high. Full bar. Veg-etarians accommodated by request ask and ye shall receive. Ask valet parkers for directions to wheelchair lift and elevators. Reservations urged. Dinners only in Dining Room, Tuesday through Sunday. Very expensive. NW

Lamont Street Grill 4445 Lamont Street, Pacific Beach, 858-270-3060. PB's most romantic restaurant serves California comfort food, punctuated by bold and sometimes strange Mexi/Asian/Cajun flavors, in a ram-bling converted residence with several rooms and levels. Dinners come with soup or salad, and many entrées are served over marvelous house-made fresh pasta. Salmon over fettuccine in a delicate dill cream sauce is especially fine. The huge array of desserts is house made, too, with something for every palate. The most desirable tables (available first come, first served) are on a fireplace-heated patio Wheelchair ramp and parking in small lot behind restaurant (call ahead and they'll save you a spot). Homey atmosphere; can get loud. Affordable wine list, full bar. Open daily, dinner only. Moderate. — N.W.

P. F. Chang's China Bistro — La Jolla 4540 La Jolla Village Drive, La Jolla, 858-458-9007. Okay, you're looking at the haunches of a giant horse right outside your corner window, and there don't seem to be any actual Chinese people among the wait staff. But this busy mall-Chinese chain (130-plus restaurants) has a certain cool. Those reproduction Chin Dynasty horses are really something, as are the bits of the Great Wall and the terra cotta soldiers scattered inside. The food? The spicy ground chicken and eggplant was too salty for our taste, the "Sichuan from the Sea" shrimp too sweet, and the Cantonese roasted duck not that exciting. Yet there are jewels, if one searches for them. And — not that it's at all Chinese — the massive "Great Wall of Chocolate" dessert will knock you over. Lunch and dinner. Moderate. — E.B.

Portugalia 4839 Newport Avenue, Ocean Beach, 619-222-7678. This spacious, informal room decorated with strings of Christmas lights resembles an ethnic community center — and in-deed, OB is home to a long-term Portuguese fishing community. The fascinating menu is split between the homeland and its former colony, Brazil, including several coconut milkswathed seafood dishes from tropical Bahia which are rarely found locally. The array of appetizers from both countries embraces addictive *bolinhos* de bacalhau (salt cod fritters) and ris-sóis de camarão (fried pastry pockets filled with shrimp). For entrées you can choose Portuguese specialties like the earthy gomes de sá (codfish with chick peas) or Brazil's bife apimentado (spicy beef) or even an African-inspired bife de moçambicana (beef with shellfish). There's also a *rodizio* option of skewered meats and/or seafood. Save room for the owner's mom's home-made desserts, especially *pastéis de nata* (delicate custard-filled pastries). Portugese wines, full bar. Not all dishes always available. Service quality variable. Long stairway up to second-floor restaurant. Live music most nights after 10 p.m. Easy parking. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday, to midnight or later except Sundays. Moderate. NW

**Rum Jungle Smoothies and Deli** 4150 Mission Boulevard #153, Pacific Beach, 858-273-2227. Why do Brazil-

ians have more fun? Açaí (ah-saa-ee). Why do Brazilians settle in PB? Maybe it's because Rum Jungle Smoothies serves up açaí, the flesh of a Brazilian palm nut, for breakfast. The dark purple mush comes from the açaí palms that grow around the Amazon River delta. Rum Jungle adds granola, banana, strawberries, blueberries, mango pieces, and honey to make a surprisingly filling breakfast. Of course this bright little place has lots of other smoothies, too, along with sandwiches. But the açaí power fruit bowl is what keeps them coming back. Open until 6 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Tapenade 7612 Fav Avenue, La Jolla,

858-551-7500. This is not only one of the finest restaurants in the county but in the country. Featuring sunny Provençal flavors, famed chef-owner Jean-Michel Diot offers superb seasonal ingredients treated with the consummate ease of a master chef. Among the special joys here are a sophisticated foie gras torchon, luscious free-range veal, and top-quality seafood, with garnishes that display an impressive balance of venturesome creativity and rigorous technique. Desserts are worth the calories, matching the style and flair of the earlier courses. And you don't even have to dress to the nines for your firstclass dinner — the sixes will do in the easy bistro atmosphere. Serving lunch (including a moderate two-course prix fixe) weekdays, and dinner daily (including bargain-priced three-course prix fixe "sunset dinners" Sunday through Thursday). Otherwise, expensive to very expensive, and worth it. —

The Third Corner Wine Shop and Bistro 2265 Bacon Street, Ocean Beach, 619-223-2700. Ed Moore's casual, loosey-goosey spot is first of all a wine shop selling most global bottlings for just 20% over wholesale. It's \$5 to pop the cork there if you plunk down at a table among the racks to enjoy casual bistro-style food designed to go with wine. You can snack on goat cheese salad, smoked duck salad, a cheese plate or a pâte plate, or get serious with braised short ribs or duck confit surprisingly paired with spicy Nawl-

ins red beans and rice. No reservations accepted, so best to go at off-hours or you'll wait for a table. Comfortable lounge with fireplace for sipping. Full bar. No corkage charge after 11 p.m., when restaurant staffers drop in for after-work noshing. Lunch and dinner until 1 a.m.; closed Monday. Low-moderate. — N.W.

Umi Sushi 2806 Shelter Island Drive, Point Loma, 619-226-1135. An instant neighborhood success, this large, cheerful sushi bar and dinner house also offers Japanese and Korean entrées, including teppanyaki (cooked in the kitchen, not at the table), Korean ribs, and excellent beef teriyaki of gently grilled prime beef. Sushi highlights include lemony ama ebi, rich garlic tuna, and a "Crazy Boy" roll spicy enough to divert your palate from the presence of imitation crabmeat. Free parking lot (often full). Special kids' menu available. Lunch Monday through Saturday, dinner daily. Sushi prices lower than most; entrées inexpensive to moderate. — N.W.

Zenbu 7660 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-4540. It was a natural for fisherman-restaurateur Matt Rimel to open a sushi bar/fish house, featuring sparkling-fresh catch, much of it from his own boats. Sashimi and the simpler sushi are better here than the big party rolls, which can be lunkish. Don't miss the sashimi of live local uni (sea urchin) served on its shell most weekends. Cooked fish entrées feature equally sparkling seafood, sometimes in almost goofily elaborate preparations. No reservations; 30-minute wait likely on weekends. Sushi bar is up a short staircase; dining room and patio tables are wheelchair accessible. Several vegetarian choices. Full bar, good sake list. Dinner nightly. Upper moderate to expensive. — N.W.

#### BAJA

**El Cid** Lopez Mateos #993, Baja, 646-178-1809. This restaurant is at the heart of the tourist district, but the cooking and service are way above coach class.



Crisp quail with rose petal sauce (famed from Like Water for Chocolate) proves outrageously delicious, and the seasonal chiles en nogada (meat-stuffed poblano chiles with walnut-cream and pomegranate) gain refinement from greaseless ground sirloin. Fish dishes are fresh, rich, and tender, and you'll find nine different ways to enjoy a steak. If you can handle a tableside production number, crépes with cajeta (caramel sauce) makes a very grand finale. Fully bilingual staff; English menus available. Vegetarian on request. Sidewalk patio dining available. Reserve for weekends during tourist peaks. Full bar, with excellent margaritas, Baja wines. Open daily, continuous service breakfast through dinner. Moderate. — N.W.

can get any cut of steak you want. A parrillada — BBQ dish — gives you marinated beef rib, carne asada, and barbecued chicken, all sizzling on a rancho-style metal tabletop grill that glows with hot coals. Best part: the roasted spring onions splayed across the meat. Dessert and coffee also included. Vegetarian upon request. Good place for a party. Open 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. — E.B.

La Espadaña Avenida Sanchez Taboada #10813, Baja, 664-634-1488. If you learn only one word of Spanish, learn this one: Borrego. Because this place does the greatest oven-cooked leg of lamb ever. The meat tastes as if it was cooked in wine, garlic, and herbs, but the owners insist it's just Tecate lamb baked slowly in its own juices with a bit of oregano. But most folks come here for beef - steaks and the popular beef fillet, sizzled at a big flame-and-smoke display counter BBQ grill. Vegetarian upon request. All terra-cotta and timber, this is where the local middle classes come for their cross-border food fix. Think Tijuana's version of Mission Valley. Still, it's charming, and you can have fun. For instance, don't forget to ask them to ring the bells set in their espadanas (holes cut in the Mission frontage) above the great arched wooden entrance door; they clank tunelessly, but they're great for celebrating your 21st birthday, Mom getting her degree whatever. Open for breakfast, lunch, dinner, seven days. Moderate. — E.B.

La Vuelta Avenida Revolución #8210,,664-685-7309. Bring your lover here and hide away in one of the cuddly carretitas - nooks. Even if traffic is ghastly at "the turn" ("la vuelta") where Revolución hooks left, vou forget all that inside this vestige of Olde Tijuana, with balcony seating, resident mariachis, and food and drink all day and night. Dive into a combinación mexicana (chile relleno, taco, and enchilada) or carne asada served in an olla de barro. an earthenware pot from Guadalajara. Even the gringo-sounding filete mignon with mushroom sauce somehow comes out Mexican. Most Mexicans actually turn up about 1 a.m., after their own parties, to be serenaded by the excellent ten-piece mariachi band. Inexpensive.

**Rica Torta** Niños Héroes Avenida #890, Baja, 664-685-8579. This café may have the best tortas (call them Mexican-style hamburgers) in Tijuana. Six-inch rashers of marinated *carne* asada, slices of ham, squares of cheese, chopped salad, tomato slices, fresh-scooped avocado...it's a double-wide, double-high burger. The menu has 16 different kinds of *tortas*, from chorizo with eggs to beefsteak ranchero, all served in huge, three-rib bed, crisptoasted Mexican bread buns. There's other stuff, but to a burger buff, one of these is quite enough. Vegetarian upon request. Open seven days. Inexpensive.

Vallarta Natural 1252 Boulevard Agua Caliente (just before El Toreo de Tijuana), Baja, 664-686-1560. Maybe the only smoke-free restaurant in Tijuana, this vegetarian haven was started in 1996 by health-conscious Doctor Georgina Vallarta de Alcantar. They make their own yogurt, soy hash, breads, rolls, salsas — and "meats" like a veal from their own wheat gluten daily. You sit at wood tables and chairs next to blue-framed vellow walls splattered with Talavera ceramic suns. At breakfast, try the *tartaleta vallarta*, a mix of eggs, spinach, mushrooms, onions, and chile. For lunch (and it's usually busiest around three), their excellent soup, *caldo tlalpeno*, packed with cheese, rice, avocado, and chile, will fill you nicely. The soy *hamburguesa* is ood, but go for the torta, which has that gluten *milanesa* along with cheese, avocado, and jalapeno. Good organic coffee. Wonderful juices, especially the cactus — if you need cleaning out. Open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Inexpen-

**Anthology** 1337 India Street, Little Italy, 619-595-0300. This spiffy, multilevel nightclub offers pleasant, userfriendly, modern-American cuisine (local produce, natural meats, wonderful breads) conceived by consulting celeb chef Bradley Ogden with popular local toque Jim Phillips. But when good musicians are cookin' onstage, the eats are liable to become mere background music for the mouth. A great date venue for jazz lovers. No cover charge Tuesdays and some Sundays, otherwise ticket prices (bought separately) vary, plus \$15 to \$20 minimums (easy to meet). Wine list is fine and wide rang ing but starts high and escalates sharply, plus full bar with fruity cocktail creations as well as classics. Dinner only, Tuesday through Sunday. Expensive on up, if you drink anything but tap water. - N.W.

**Bale French Sandwich Shop** 4879 University Avenue, City Heights 619-283-4352. Ann Nguyen started this back in 1980. Ann's brother succeeded her, and the prices have hardly changed
— they're incredibly low. But the taste of her sandwiches is up there in French-Vietnamese heaven. The Vietnamese are special at this: they do French better than the French — with some spicy Asian touches. The BBQ Pork French sandwich delivers the immediate taste of cilantro, garlicky mayonnaise, sweet barbecue sauce, carrots, onions, cucumber, and lashings of sliced pork, with the occasional heat of a green jalapeño. But above all, it's that crunch of bread — fresh, feathery, and very French — that makes this hard to beat. Add dessert of homemade banana shrimp cake and - voila! Open daily,

breakfast through early dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Big Kitchen 3003 Grape Street, South Park, 619-234-5789. This isn't just a restaurant, it's the social center of the universe — and Judy "The Beauty" Forman is its queen. Blame her for the Fern Street Circus, for driving the Miss California beauty pageant out of town, and for disgustingly healthy dishes like Judy's Favorite (spinach, mushrooms, sherry, and eggs). Our favorite: the avocado, cream cheese, and chives omelet. Vegans' fave may be the "veg-gie option": sauteed spinach, mush-rooms, onions, cilantro, brown rice, tofu, and roasted garlic. Her cooks make pretty much everything on the spot, including muffins, waffles, and pancakes. While you're waiting, they always have this "out there" eclectic crowd, plus walls filled with pictures and bon mots like "Will Be President For Food." Breakfast and lunch only; closes at 2 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Blue Water Seafood Market and Grill 3667 India Street, Mission Hills, 619-497-0914. This bright, clean charmer a half-block south of El Indio has a double identity: First, it's a retail fish market; aside from Whole Foods, this is the only restaurant-quality fresh raw seafood south of I-8 and west of City Heights. If you love oysters, don't miss the big, buttery bivalves here. Second, it serves simple, terrific seafood to eat in or out. Plates are plastic, but don't look for greasy fried stuff. En-trées are grilled gently until perfectly done, topped with your pick of flavors (the lemon-garlic butter is especially tastv) and come with rice and a huge salad with your choice of terrific house made dressings. If indecisive, ask what's best that day. The overstuffed grilled fish tacos are messy and perfect, with just the right proportions of ingredi-ents. Reachable only by driving north on India. Metered street parking by day. Good choice of beers; a few affordable wines; \$5 corkage for BYOW. Open daily, lunch and dinner, Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W.

**Bombay Exotic Cuisine of India** 3975 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-3155. We're talking northern India

here, right? That means lots of lamb, potatoes, creamy sauces, tandoorbaked breads, chicken, and less of the south's mouth-scalding heat. At least in its daily buffet, Bombay's a lot less spicy (though their sag paneer creamy, cheesy spinach — delivered a surprising punch). The buffet includes tandoori chicken, assorted *pakoras* (lentil-batter fritters), mock duck, chicken *tikka*, and, if you hit the right day, an addictive mango soup. If you want meat or spicy food, best to order from the menu — say, a creamy *tikka* masala with lamb, or long kebabs of minced lamb (kebab curry), or the rich Rombay Coconut Malai, Tell them Bombay Coconut Malai, Tell them whether you want it mild, spicy or, for leather-mouths, tikhi. For a cheap, light meal, try a couple of lamb samosas. And be sure they bring the chutneys, India's real unexplored treasure. Lunch and dinner; buffet at lunch and Monday evenings only. Sister restaurant, Monsoon, 729 Fourth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-234-5555. Moderate. E.B.

Brians' American Eatery - Hill**crest** 1451 Washington Street, Hillcrest, 619-296-8268. Note the apostrophe: Not one but two Brians have taken over what had been Topsy's, a venerable coffeehouse/eatery for 40 years. They've done a good job of cleaning it up without gutting the fifties roadhouse character. It's open all night on weekends, and late night is quite a scene. But for a lot of people, breakfast is the thing. The Brians' eight-ounce charbroiled top sirloin steak with eggs and country potatoes is a great Saturday morning treat. Or the "Hey Ricky!!!," an omelet with chorizo, avocado, green chilies, onions, and cheeses. Or ask for their off-menu breakfast special — it's al-ways cheaper. Another good thing: coffee comes by the thermos-full. Three meals until 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday; open 24 hours from early Friday morning until Sunday evening. Inexpensive. — E.B.

**Brickyard Coffee and Tea** 675 West G Street, Downtown, 619-696-7220. The problem, if you're rich enough to live in the Marina District, is the lack of café life. That is, until this modest little eatery and café settled in

next to the tracks by the Seaport Village trolley stop. You sit under 11 poplar trees in a brick patio that has one unusual downtown advantage — except for the wind sifting through the poplars (or a trolley pulling in), it's completely silent here. Sipping coffee and reading your paper is the thing here, but you can fill up, too, with items like "Texas chili," or grilled cheese and tomato sandwich with a cup of chili, or spinach and mushroom quiche with a small Caesar salad, or panini. You can also order half a sandwich — turkey, ham, beef, or tuna — with a cup of soup or Caesar salad. It's the nearest thing to a ing till 3 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Bully's East 2401 Camino del Rio South, Mission Valley, 619-291-2665. Despite the plasma TV sports screen, this place is very '60s. For example, dark, woody, plush red booths. And al-ways crowded. Word is, they serve more prime rib with au jus and horseradish than any eatery in San Diego. The "Petite Cut" 8 ounce, their smallest, fills you plenty, with its baked potato and salad. But just once, come here with your main squeeze and order up the "full cut for two." It hangs ten over the edges. Or go bonkers and order the 32-ounce cut (available in Mission Valley) — just to watch your neighbors' eyes bug out. Not flush? Try the "Bully Burger," French Dip sand-wich, or calamari sandwich. Lonely? Go to the horseshoe-shaped Low Bar. Lunch and dinner daily. — E.W.

Café Chloe 721 Ninth Avenue Downtown, 619-232-3242. How did we ever manage before this indispens able bistro opened? In a bright and beautiful setting with small tables, barseating, and a patio, you'll find light and lovely Parisian-style bistro fare with substantial breakfasts, svelte lunches and dinners, and sophisticated bar-nibbles. Don't miss breakfast's poached eggs with sage-truffle beurre blanc. Nightly specials keep the menu interesting, and desserts are worth every calorie. Beverages include divine lavender lemonade, root beer choices, and an intelligent wine list at modest

markups, most available by the glass. Metered street-parking daytime. No reservations except large groups. Moderate. — N.W.

**Chicken Pie Shop of San Diego** 2633 El Cajon Boulevard, North Park, 619-295-0156. How much do people love this place? Count the chickens lining the walls - ceramic, wood, beaded painted, even feathered. Hundreds. They're gifts from generations of customers. Now, as in the 1930s when it started up, the basic chicken pie comes filled with big chunks of chicken meat, doused with white gravy and accompanied by mashed potatoes, veggies, coleslaw, a roll, and dessert — like the delicious pineapple pie available Mondays - all for one really low price. The menu also offers fried chicken, burgers and steaks, but 90 percent of customers still order that same old chicken pie. Seven days. Cash only. Inexpensive.

Chive 558 Fourth Avenue, Downtown, 619-232-4483. Here you'll find a new cuisine for the upscale residential neighborhood rising around the restaurant. Diners can choose an adventurous meal or an evening of so-phisticated comfort food. Urbane multicultural fusion dishes dance cheek to cheek with remade American classics and the occasional sleek French luxury dish. A "grazing menu" features small bites for folks on a diet or on the run. The menu changes seasonally.—N.W.

Dobson's 956 Broadway Circle. Downtown, 619-231-6771. This reputable downtown restaurant offers class and comfort, geared for people who enjoy eating well. The food is good, of-ten very good, as with chicken liver mousse pâté, Mediterranean blue mus sels, and, when available, the crude but virtuous soft-shell crab. Their sweets such as brownies, are hefty, louche, and cheap. Bring a date to the upstairs dining room. Dobson's is suave, its confidence infectious. Lunch and dinner Monday through Friday; dinner only on Saturday. Moderate to expensive. – M.N.

El Agave 2304 San Diego Avenue, Old Town, 619-220-0692. Reservations recommended. Wheelchair access difficult (steep ramp). You'll find upscale, unusual Mexican specialties in an intimate Spanish-style dining room or on a small heated balcony. The menu celebrates three great pre-Hispanic cuisines — Aztec, Mayan, Nahuatl with discrete admixtures of France, Spain, and Italy. (It's the history of Mexico on a plate.) Among the high-lights are the five different Oaxacan moles (plus a sixth from Chiapas), lo-cal sea bass in tangy jamaica (hibiscus) sauce, and a unique appetizer, tlacogos cuitlacoche, ovals of blue corn masa topped with a sort of "mushroom" that grows on corn ears. (In English it's called "corn smut," but it tastes much nicer than that sounds.) The bar stocks at least 1700 tequilas and makes a foodfriendly on-the-rocks margarita with fresh fruit juices. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. —*N.W.* 

El Indio Mexican Restaurant 3695 India Street (at Winder), Mission Hills, 619-299-0333. El Indio, "the god of Mexican food," presides over this bustling (expect a line), airy restaurant in an atmosphere of pale blue 1940s solidity. The menu includes the usual suspects (burritos, tacos, etc.), plus slightly less common items (machaca, chile rellenos). Excellent house-made corn tortillas help the standard fare to better approximate the divine. So do the sub-lime core flavors of the meats — the chicken in the taco and the beef in the enchiladas. The carne asada sports a pleasant char, and the beans have a raw-beany intensity. Less heavenly: seasonings (especially paprika and salt) tend toward the heavy side. Open daily, breakfast through dinner. Inexpensive. — A.M.

El Pollo Loco 2795 Main Street, Logan Heights, 619-595-0847. Additional locations in Midway, Carmel Mountain, Chula Vista, El Cajon, Lemon Grove, National City, Poway, and more. This Mexican-style chicken chain offers healthier, tastier fast food. The flame-broiled poultry has crisp, richly seasoned, very salty skin; the flesh can vary from barely done to overdone, but usually is just right. The bird (or any assortment of its parts) comes with sage gravy, tortillas, and a choice of side dishes that includes rich, sweet black beans, crisp and clean coleslaw, great gooey-cheesy macaroni, and passable mashed potatoes. Help yourself to salsas (there are four varieties), chopped onions, lemons, cilantro, hot peppers. But stick with the chicks — the taque ria-style choices are barely better than Taco Bell. Check for daily specials, wherein a small amount of cash will buy a huge amount of highly palatable poultry. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — N.W.

El Zarape 4642 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-682-1652. This stylish little Mexican restaurant on a tony stretch of Park Boulevard is proof that not all taco shop food is equal. Try a shredded beef or chicken taco or tostada and you'll know what we mean, with their generous mounds of juicy, slow-cooked meat. Many enjoy their unusual scallop burritos, vegetarian potato-filled burritos and rolled tacos, and well-prepared soups. We go for the stewed meat. El Zarape is dependable, serving Mexican with solid, homemade, handmade flavor. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. — *M.N.*

And the wine list boasts far more than just burly Cabernets and Bordeaux — over 100 of the far-flung offerings are available by the glass, and you can assemble your own three-glass tasting flights. Prime steaks are the main event, perfectly cooked and wellseasoned. Try the Key Lime pie for

dessert — custardy and full of limey bite. Valet parking. Dinner nightly. Very expensive. — A.M.

Galileo 101 201 J Street, Downtown, 619-702-7101. This could be the ideal neighborhood restaurant — if you love exploring Middle Eastern cuisines. The Moroccan specialties at Kous Kous are delicious, authentic, and healthful, and the witty, entertaining staff treat you like guests at an informal dinner party Unlike most Moroccan restaurants in the U.S., the menu is à la carte rather than prix fixe, and seating is at normal chairs and tables, not floor cushions, so you can focus on the food and not some Arabian Nights fantasy. Start with a lively chutney sampler appetizer plate of mezze, Moroccan style, and if b'stila

**Gourmet India** 810 Fourth Avenue, Downtown, 619-702-7967. Most local Indian restaurants share nearly identical pan-regional menus (yawn). Gourmet India, in contrast, serves authentic regional delicacies you won't find at the clones. Don't miss the distinctive appetizers, especially the crunchy sev poori (wheat wafers with a vibrant, spicy fresh topping), the bel poori (India's favorite railway snack), or southern India's uttapam, pancakes (made of cream of wheat) resembling soft, exotic mini-pizzas, accompanied by a coconutty fresh chutney. Peshawari naan is a spectacular tandoorcooked bread stuffed with cashews, raisins, and fresh cheese, and tandoori chicken wings are tender and savory with their lively green dipping sauce. Entrées include the rarely seen mirchi tikka, tender boneless chicken from the tandoor, steeped in a bright, spicy, lime-juice marinade. Madrasi Fish in coconut milk is a delicious Southernstyle coconut milk curry, and the house specialty, Bombay Chicken, is a salty and oddly homey-tasting stew. Interesting and appropriate wine list; numerous Indian and international beers. You can eat royally on a prosperous peasant's budget. Lunch and dinner daily. (Parking not validated at Horton.) Moderate. — *N.W.* 

Grant Grill 326 Broadway, Downtown, 619-232-3121. The hotel has reopened after its \$52 million renovation, and it's looking magnificent. The Grant Grill, too, is changed and freshened. In days of yore, the bill of fare combined French haute cuisine with British hotel-grill staples. Now it's thoroughly Southern Californian (although they did resurrect the fabled mock turtle soup in response to diner pleas) with nods to the "Slow Food" movement. Well-raised meats, local produce, and artisanal products include housemade burrata mozzarella and herbed bread. Entrées are large, rather salty, and have fine side items, but there's still a basic conservatism at work. Nothing here to scare the horses. Appetizers and amusebouches are more engaging than en-trées, while desserts are in the "needs more work" stage. Serving pace, especially on busy evenings, is slow. But the town's movers and shakers are back at their old favorite haunt. Breakfast, lunch, and dinner daily. Very expen-

Hob Nob Hill 2271 First Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-239-8176. It opened in 1944 as a 14-stool lunch counter. Now, you sweep in under the maroon canopy to shiny red booth seats, deep blue carpet, blond wood, paintings, and a halfwall of wine. You're thinking "business class," but don't be fooled. We're talking coffee-shop prices, especially with the all-day breakfasts and sandwiches, not to mention the burgers with a salad tossed in. It's across the street from a retirement condo complex and at dinner, says the owner, "We cater to seniors." While there are à la carte choices, affordable three-course prix fixe dinners (with a regular entrée for each day of the week, Mom style) are the order of the day — e.g., tasty barbecued pork on Saturday, roast lamb or pot roast Sunday. Open daily. Inexpensive to low moderate. — E.B.

Huffman's Bar-B-Que 5039 Imperial Avenue, College Area, 619-264-3115. This cafe has a huge multigenerational following, some famous — check out their wall photos, in which Jesse Jackson and Muhammad Ali are just two — and some not so famous. The big draw is Huffman's fabulous Southern soul food. Try their gravy-



smothered fried chicken served with collard greens, yellow peppers, red beans, rice, and white mopping-up bread, or their Louisiana Creole gumbo, thick with crab, shrimp, links, ham, and chicken. Other fine eats include the catfish sandwich and halfpound rib tips. Open daily, lunch and dinner, to 11 p.m. weekdays, 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Ikea Restaurant 2149 Fenton Parkway, Mission Valley, 619-283-6166. Central shrine for San Diego's 10,000 Swedes, so they say. They come to taste open-faced sandwiches, salmon shrimp, and meatballs again. This restaurant inside Sweden's wildly successful "home interiors" chain is a great intro to Swedish tastes. The food's more sensible than exciting, of course. But healthy — beef and pork for the meatballs are guaranteed hormonefree. You eat the meatballs with Swedish lingonberry (not cranberry) sauce. Seafood is big: the shrimp openfaced sandwich, the salmon plate with potatoes and broccoli, and the Gravad Lox Plate (cured salmon) are always on. And if you want to be disgustingly healthy, chew on their fresh vegetable plate (raw carrot sticks, cauliflower, garbanzo beans, and mushrooms). All for a song. The only health hazard: hordes of babies and kids romping in the restaurant's mother-friendly play area. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Joe's Crab Shack — Mission Valley, 7610 Hazard Center Drive, Mission Valley, 619-574-8617. Joe's is silly with crab-shack ambiance (campy nautical paraphernalia on down to souvenir gimme caps), but the food's not bad. You can choose buckets of steamed, barbecued, or garlic crab (of various subspecies), or go for fried or grilled seafood or steaks, or salads. Grown-ups may prefer the patio to the rockin', raucous interior. Full bar, not much wine. Inexpensive to low moderate. Also in Oceanside, Pacific Beach, and downtown.— N.W.

**Krakatoa** 1128 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-230-0272. This used to be an abandoned property. Now the swamp-

green clapboard house is the coolest, if (reportedly) ghost-ridden, coffee-eatery hang-outery in Golden Hill. Its garden is lush and tropical, and on its wooden deck laptops unfold, essays get written, relationships get worked out. The menu is light, the names heavy: the breakfast sandwich (scrambled eggs, cheese, fruit) is the Wonchi (an Ethiopian caldera); the roast turkey sandwich with ham, cream cheese, and cranberry sauce is the Ubehebe (a dormant volcano in Death Valley); the Amboy (a Mojave Desert volcano) is a peanut butter, honey, banana, cinnamon, and bacon sandwich. Open 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. (Sundays till 6 p.m.). Inexpensive. — E.B.

La Casita 1247 C Street, Downtown 619-531-0044. Don't be fooled by the li'l old blue-and-white clapboard house at the bottom of City College's hill. Princes and politicians come to this full-service restaurant to hammer out deals, mix with the Latino (or Anglo) community, and eat some of the best chorizo con huevos (spicy pork sausage with eggs) in town. Fair-weather eaters flock to the spacious garden patio to chow down among the songbirds. In the cozy Mexican-style interior, the pictures on the walls tell you who-all comes here for the good tacos and enchiladas or the delicious pork burritos. Most delicious of all is watching Anglo City-Hallers trying valiantly to learn to love the house-made menudo (tripe soup). Delivery anywhere downtown 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Open six days 6 a.m. to 3 p.m., closed Sundays.— E.B.

La Doña 1784 Newton (at Beardsley), Southeast San Diego, 619-233-4939. This café is steeped in Mexican history, especially Barrio Logan history. You half expect to see several L.A. Zootsuitors drift in as you inspect the blackand-white shots of the late actress Maria Felix (Mexico's Marilyn Monroe) or the great photos of the Mexican Revolution that include Zapata and Pancho Villa. The place has been here for 63 years, and old-timers say it reminds them of long-ago cafés in Los Angeles, Modesto, or Madera. The food is home cooking, Mexican style, with meals like scrambled eggs and chorizo with rice and refried beans. Watch out for the pot o' salsa — it's a real jaw-slammer. Other dishes to sample include *chicharrones, menudo*, and *pozole*. Seven days, breakfast to late lunch. In-

Lightnin' Jacks BBQ 4705-H Clairemont Drive, Clairemont, 858-270-8227. Clean, cute, and a little selfconscious, this barbecue has black-andwhite Western pictures on the walls and some seating on barstools with metal "saddles" (more comfortable than they look). The barbecue mechanism is a Texas-style pit smoker burning sweet hickory. The meats that emerge from it aren't the smokiest, but they're tasty enough. Pork ribs are tender and moist, and beef brisket carries enough smoke flavor to pass muster in Texas; other meat choices are less successful. The tomato sauce is pleasant but ordinary. A fried catfish plate makes a flavorful alternative (but beware the cat sandwich, awash in hot sauce). Hush puppies and sweet potato fries are the most savory sides. Check your take-out bag to make sure you're getting what you ordered, as youthful staff is easily flustered. Kiddie plates available. Draft beer and wine available. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to moderate.

The Linkery 3386 30th Street, North Park, 619-255-8778. The artisanal "slow food" cuisine here features local ingredients and made-from-scratch preparations. Despite the name, there's a full menu that includes tasty grilled vegetable appetizers and some fine entrées. But the focus is on the side dishes of fresh sausages made daily onpremises. These vary not only in composition but in palatability. Good ones include chicken curry, *linguisa*, Polynesian pork. Venturesome international wine list at low markups, plus international beers and Mexican Coca-Cola (better tasting than U.S. made). Small parking lot (enter by alley on Upas just east of Jack in the Box). Noisy even when nearly empty. No reservations. Dinner daily, until 11 p.m. Moderate. — N W

Lou and Mickey's 224 Fifth Avenue, Downtown, 619-237-4900. The one-time ornate Royale Brasserie across from the Convention Center finally had to bow to conventional tastes and simplify into a fifties-style steak-and-seafood house. Kings Seafood is still the owner, so the fish quality remains fine. The fare is simple, with minimal sauce or garnish; vegetables cost extra, coming in large portions but merely adequate preparations. Best dishes include "BBQ Shrimp, Manales' Style," a buttery, spicy New Orleans ex-

travaganza (available as starter or entrée), and the huge, juicy rib-eye "Cowboy Steak." Valet parking at door. Wraparound heated dining patio. Noisy in dining room near bar; request "Nude Room" for quiet. For interesting wines at good prices, look into "Adventures" sections of the list. Dinner nightly, weekends until 11 p.m. Fish moderate, meats expensive. — N.W.

Oceanaire Seafood Room 400 J Street, Downtown, 619-858-2277. Oceanaire serves all manner of fresh seafood, including some rare species, from simple preparations to complex dishes with international influences (France, Italy, Asia, Louisiana, fusion). Fusion-y appetizers range from crab cakes (among the best in town) and lively El Diablo fried squid to disappointing oysters "Gatesafellar" and laughable "Cajun-rubbed" prawns. ("Eh, Soileau! C'mere, let me rub these prawns on you!") Of a menu comprising some 30 entrées, the best dishes tend to be the least ambitious choices from the Simply Grilled and Broiled section. Or you can gamble on more elaborate but risky composed entrées - e.g., fire-roasted Mano de León scallops in an Asian-style treatment are earthy and delicious, but spiny lobster is buried under an overwhelming, incoherent sauce. Let K.I.S.S. be your guideline. Vegetables and side dishes, served family size at extra charge, aren't wonderful. Housemade desserts are pretty good and sized for groups. The oyster bar is a pleasant separate area for snacking or seasonal special dinners; in season, the Kumamotos are superb, other varieties less thrilling. Reservations urged, especially on weekends. Dinner daily. Happy hour at oyster bar moderate, dinner very expensive. —

Po Pazzo 1917 India Street, Little Italy, 619-238-1917. The restaurant's name means "a little crazy," but owner Joe Busalacchi was crazy like a fox to open the first seriously swanky eatery in Little Italy. The decor resembles the set of a Manhattan supper club in a black-and-white movie, right down to the gray color scheme and curvy booths. Music plays loudly (with a live pianist Thursday through Saturday), keeping the energy and noise levels high. You almost expect to see Frankie and Dino at the next table. The USDA Prime steaks are flash-roasted in a special oven at 1700 degrees (in the style

of Ruth's Chris), and if they're a little chewy, they're also flavorful — especially the "Sicilian steak." But the pasta dishes are even better, and the veggies accompanying the entrées often outshine the proteins — the kitchen is still Italian at heart and the fundamental things apply. Full bar. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner only weekends. Reservations advised. Expensive. — N. W.

RA Sushi 474 Broadway, Downtown, 619-321-0021. Big and splashy, this Arizona-based chain restaurant tries to create a high-energy party atmosphere with loudish music and louder "Oriental" decor. Its grazing menu features sushi, sashimi, and hosts of Asian-oid appetizers, plus a few substantial noodle dishes and entrées. The food's a mixture of the dire and the delicious — old, pulpy edamame versus magnificent miso soup, delicate dilled salmon and desiccated katsu. The sushi rice is well seasoned, but the products are inconsistent from hour to hour and roll to roll, depending on how long ago the seafood was defrosted and how recently the rice was cooked. You take your chances, but it's fun anyway. Numerous Asian beers and sakes, affordable wines, full bar specializing in fancy cocktails. Those with fading eyesight may need a penlight to read the menu. Daily, lunch through dinner, to 1 a.m. Bar open to 2 a.m. Moderate. — N.W.


Ranchos Cocina — North Park 3910 30th Street, North Park, 619-574 1288. At both locations of this delightful mini-chain you'll find healthy, cre-ative Mexican and vegetarian cuisine in cheerful, tropical-style settings burgeoning with plant life and craft objects. A big plus: zero attitude. You don't have to be vegi-virtuous to enjoy full-flavored combinations that are as creative as they are wholesome. Try anything with lobster or calamari steak in fact, all the seafood here is pristine. And sample something with the house-made mole sauce of a zillion ingredients. Actually, try...anything. (Well, the chicken breast is as dry here as everywhere else. Try anything else.) Open daily breakfast through dinner. No reservations, but call ahead for large parties. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Saigon on Fifth 4900 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-220-8828. This is the rare local Vietnamese restaurant that emphasizes the urban, French-influenced cuisine of colonial-era Saigon and Hue, rather than the ubiquitous *pho* noodle soups of the North. The list of house specialties includes many entrées you won't find elsewhere in San Diego, among them a smoked oyster omelet and a unique version of coconut shrimp served in the coconut shell. Many dishes here include honey, so the Boon (spicy noodle salad) deserves it name — a refreshing break from the sweetness. Well-chosen, reasonable wine list suits the food, as does the serene decor. Validated underground parking just north of the bank. Open daily, lunch and dinner until midnight. Low moderate. — *N.W.* 

Sala Thai 6161 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-229-9050. With purple cloth napkins, white tablecloths, green banquettes, butter-colored walls, and a portrait of King Chulalongkorn, Sala Thai has all the trappings of a class ioint - except vou're only paying six or eight bucks for main dishes. The food? A bit gentle on the spice front. Tom yum kung, the famous shrimp soup, should make your neck hairs stick straight out, but if that's what you want you'll have to ask the cooks to make it spicier. Chicken *mussaman*, labeled "medium spicy," is pretty tame but still delicious with its authentic taste-boosters like kaffir lime leaves. Hottest curry: "chicken green." Health treat: Som tum, the famous papaya salad. Lunch, dinner daily; dinner only on Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Sammy's Woodfired Pizza — Downtown 770 Fourth Avenue, Downtown 770 Fourth Avenue, Downtown, 619-230-8888. It's not Italian or New York pizza, it's...San Diego pizza! The crusts are Californian: thick and slightly sweet. The toppings range from ordinary to exotic. The menu includes many salads and a handful of American-Italian entrées. Continuous service, same menu lunch and dinner. Open daily. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Sang Dao 4212 National Avenue, Logan Heights, 619-263-0914. Laos has an exotic Shangri-La thing about it, yet the large family that runs this eatery will tell you Lao food is quite plain and simple: vegetables, freshwater fish, chicken, pork, occasional beef, sticky rice, and noodles. But taste their delicious spicy catfish and you're right back at exotic. Thai basil, garlic, and most of all, the gingery galanga, a.k.a. "Laos root," help make it unfishy. Other must-trys: BBQ beef, som yum (papaya salad), and especially the spicy salad

with minced meat called larb - closest thing to the national dish. The surroundings here may be homey, but not the excellent cuisine. "Sang Dao"? It means "Star Light." Open 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. six days, closed Monday. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* 

Shakespeare Pub 3701 India Street, Mission Hills, 619-299-0230, Probably the most convincing English pub in town. The Bard's brew-house boasts bare-board floors, diamond lead-glass windows, and authentic Brits sitting around the bar quaffing ale from their own pewter mugs. Pub grub is bluff and plain-spoken. Shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, ploughman's plate (the pickled onions and cheese, Scotch egg, and Branston pickle make it the real thing) — all are great with rich English beer, say, a Boddington's Pub Ale Sunday's roast beef dinner is worth dragging vourself out of bed for, too The pub includes a shop that sells British goods. Breakfast weekends, lunch weekdays, and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

**Sixth Avenue Bistro** 1165 Sixth Avenue, Downtown, 619-239-4194. This charming, airy cafe offers some very credible New Orleans-style cooking at affordable prices. Among the sandwiches are an outstanding oyster po' boy (with big juicy oysters and good light batter) and a fine, fully packed approximation of a muffaletta, albeit with a kaiser roll standing in for Central Grocery's big, round Italian bread. The jambalaya is tasty, too, even with the substitute for andouille Wine and beer No reservations. Breakfast to dinner (closes 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday, 2 p.m. on Sunday). Inexpensive.

Toshi Sushi 5943 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-287-3536. Don't ask what's in the "dynamite" sauce (besides the obvious mayo and smelt roe) — it's a house secret, one the restaurant dangles before you in numerous contexts. Try it baked onto the rich, everything-goes Garbage Roll where deep-fried shrimp, freshwater eel, and tuna add flavor to the creamycrunchy interplay of sauce and vegeta-bles. Rolls, both plain and elaborate, abound here. While some can be heavy on the rice and light on the fish, others are triumphs. The Toshi Tempura Special Roll takes battered whitefish and wraps it around the seaweed casing, which is then filled with just-cooked whitefish and a host of garnishes — an exotic-yet-homey fried-fish alternative. The Johnny Roll shows octopus at its most tender, but watch out for spotlight-hogging sweet cream cheese. The simpler sushi can vary — a brilliant, translucent slice of tuna offset by a blander, duller salmon. Japanese en trees are also available. Inexpensive to moderate. — A.M.

Tropical Star 6163 Balboa Avenue Clairemont, 858-488-5900. A modest cafe and grocery offers Puerto Rican and Latin American food and groceries. Very modest surroundings; good authentic inexpensive food. Same menu all day Monday through Saturday: closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.W.

Whole Foods Market 711 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-294-2800. For vegetarians on the go, Whole Foods' prepared food section will feed you better — and faster — than any vegetarian restaurant in town. Out-standing selections include the Emerald Mushrooms salad, and especially the farofa salad — it's like American stuffing, but it's couscous studded with almonds, fat raisins, thin strips of scrambled egg, and bits of carrot and bell pepper. Whole Foods' vegetarian meals will tempt any meat-eater with their delicious originality. La Jolla branch at 8825 Villa La Jolla Drive, 858-642-6700. Inexpensive to moderate. —

#### **NORTH INLAND**

Abbey's Real Texas BBQ — Kearny Mesa 9533 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Kearny Mesa, 858 279-7427. Texas barbecue consists of meat, chicken, turkey, and links that are repeatedly mopped with a mari-nade and cooked in a big cast-iron smoker (rather than grilled over a fire). Here they use mesquite to barbecue the poultry quickly and the brisket ve-r-ry slowly. In addition to the usual BBQ sides (potato salad, coleslaw, beans, etc.), they offer a Caesar salad. At the Miramar branch the room is large and unadorned but very clean. Wheelchair accessible. Same menu lunch and dinner. Open daily; continuous service for lunch and early dinner weekdays; nor-mal dinner hours weekends. Inexpensive to low moderate. - N.W.

Centre City Café 2680 S. Escondido Boulevard, Escondido, 760-489-6011. In the quiet little "motel row" just north of Lake Hodges, this cute, friendly cafe serves classic American diner food, including all-day breakfast. The chicken-fried steak is exemplary, with a crackly batter-crust and a smooth, peppery cream gravy. Several cuts of USDA Choice steaks are offered at rock-bottom prices, and early bird dinners and daily specials offer amaz-ing bargains. You can eat inside, in a coffee-shop ambiance, or chow down on the dining terrace in front. Open daily, three meals. Huge portions, low prices. — N.W.

China Max 4698 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-650-3333. The decor is plain and bright, the sound level loud, but this is a major resource for authentic Hong Kong cooking — creative and multiregional, filtered through the refined wizardry of the genuine Cantonese style. The seafood aswim in the live tanks includes such delicacies as black cod (bony but won derfully sweet), Dungeness crab, and (if you've got the money) abalone — but even inexpensive, homey dishes (e.g., wonton soup, crabmeat cakes) sing with flavor. Call ahead for reservations to avoid a wait at the door. A Pan-Asian community throngs here, for good reason. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to exorbitant but mainly moderate. — N.W.

**Fiore's** 777 Harrah's Way, Valley Center, 877-777-2457. This is where Valley Center goes to celebrate special occasions. An island of serenity in the cacophonous casino, the restaurant of-fers fine certified-Angus grilled steaks and chops of various species. For a starter, the shrimp margarita is deli-

cious. Choices include numerous seafood entrées, and for lighter eating there's an oyster bar attached. The best attraction is the long, adventurous wine list, offering international bottles at bargain prices with by-the-glass choices galore. Half the fun is matching wines to foods. The beer list is sophisticated, too, as are well-priced cognacs and aged ports. Business-casual dress code. Kids allowed in casino restaurants, not in gambling area. Reservations advised for weekends. Open for dinner daily. Moderate at oystar bar; upper moderate to very expensive in restaurant. - N.W.

The Grill 10920 Roselle Street, Suite #104, Carmel Valley, 858-587-7940. Sorrento Valley is where you commute to work, not to live, so forget warm neighborhood eateries. At first glance, the Grill is what you'd expect — standard strip mall, bare-bones furnishings, office-lunch oriented. But the Greek owners give it character with generous but cheap breakfast dishes like the Mediterranean omelet and lunch specials such as the luscious Philly cheese steak. And they're flexible. Want bacon, sausage, and ham in your breakfast pita? They'll do all three, same price as with a single meat. Breakfast and lunch weekdays. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Hacienda de Vega 2608 South Es-

condido Boulevard, Escondido, 760-738-9805. This is a Mexican restaurant with a difference — or two. The setting is a gorgeous restored Old California-style hacienda set on two acres. including a verdant courtyard (complete with fountain) for fair-weather dining. The menu is also a leap upward from standard fare. Senora Vega offers authentic Mexican cuisine cooked in the sophisticated manner of Mexico City, her hometown — not borderfood compromises. You'll find an array of fresh and interesting appetizers along with a wide choice of serious entrées featuring complex, delicious sauces. Each dish is seasoned to the optimum spiciness for its overall flavor not the land of the bland. The Sunday all-you-can-eat brunch offers a whole sampling of goodies brought to your table, with refills as desired. Five vegetarian entrées and a kiddie menu available; casual atmosphere. Full bar specializing in margaritas, of course. Open daily, lunch (or brunch) and dinner.

**San Diego Artisan Bakers** 1551 South Escondido Boulevard, Escondido, 760-740-5963. This Europeanstyle bakery specializes in hearty, hand-crafted, slow-fermented breads made from natural ingredients. Recipes of the 24 loaves are from France, Italy, Germany, and the U.S. These loaves have textures and depths of flavor you'll never find in supermarket-bakery breads. And for breakfast or a snack, there's nothing better than settling on the front porch with a cup of espresso and one of the moist and chewy scones. Open Monday through Saturday, morning to late afternoon. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Sand Crab Cafe 2229 Micro Place Escondido, 760-480-2722. Sandy Crabbe (honest, that's his name) owns this fun, funky dive in the wilds of industrial Escondido near the San Marcos border. A visit offers the primor-dial, preschoolish joy of whacking crabs to pieces with mallets and eating them with your hands. (Bibs are optional.) Everybody gets into the party spirit. There's a huge à la carte list of appetizers, soups, snacks, and main courses often at bargain prices. Entrées include several crab-bucket combos, cooked to a well-seasoned boil with corn, potatoes, and spicy Louisiana sausage. Most


of the shellfish were flash-frozen on shipboard, but they're still tasty. The melted non-butter "spread" accompa-nying them appeals to the area's many health-conscious residents. (Or you can BYOButter and they'll melt it for you.) Fine tangy house-made Key lime pie is a perfect finale. Beer and wine and good margaritas. Open daily, lunch and dinner. **Seoul B.B.Q.** 4344 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-505-8700. This Korean restaurant means sitting before a sizzling cast-iron grill, sipping hot sake, the smell of grilled beef, grilled onions, and fresh garlic in the air. Try the "Korean B.B.Q." marinated short ribs (tong galbi) or thick marbled slices of sirloin (beef gui). You'll enjoy all the accompanying dishes that make the meal, like crunchy seaweed salads, radishes in garlicky tomato sauce, slow-cooked potatoes with soy sauce and jalapeño pepper. Feeling adventurous? Go for the goat meat hot pot or Korean steak tartare (yukhwoe). This is sensual, elemental, hairy-chested food. Lunch and dinner six days, closed Sunday. — M.N.

#### **NORTH COASTAL**

101 Café 631 South Coast Highway, Oceanside, 760-722-5220. This is the oldest li'l eating establishment in Oceanside. Cooks have been flipping burgers here since 1928. The café is named after Route 101, the Pacific Highway. Old-timers remember when everyone from truck drivers to movie stars would stop for a bite before heading on to San Diego and Tijuana. Try the ABC (avocado, bacon, and cheese) Omelet, the 101 Original Cheeseburger with its "secret sauce," chicken-fried steaks with eggs and, of course, the Great Depression dish: biscuits with gravy and home fries. Open daily, three meals until midnight. Inexpensive. Cash only. No alcohol. — E.B.

Armenian Café 3126 Carlsbad Boulevard, Carlsbad, 760-720-2233. At this large cottage with a year-round heated sundeck overlooking Highway

101, the menu offers Armenian specialties cooked with a Lebanese accent as well as generic Middle Eastern crowd pleasers, including gyros made from scratch. Lamb shish kebab is the house specialty, a "loss leader" featuring tender premium lamb cubes with assertive seasonings, grilled over gas. Even better are distinctive dishes from the owner's family recipes: his mom's Lebanese kibbe (a large, glorified nutfilled lamb meatball) is outstanding, as is her kashta lea dessert — an exotic nutmeg sponge cake fragrant with rosewater syrup, topped with pistachios and thickened cream. Dinner platters constitute a full meal, including a great "Armenian salad" and a tasty dip for the meat, along with less-than-great egg-lemon soup, pilaf, and pita wedges. Wine list is dreary, but corkage fee is reasonable. Three meals daily. Live music and belly dancer Friday and Saturday night. Moderate to slightly expensive. — N.W.

Blanca 437 South Highway 101, Solana Beach, 858-792-0072. The opening of sleek, sophisticated Blanca marks the arrival of our first 21st-Century restaurant, highlighting perfect seasonal ingredients so radiantly and originally prepared that diners must rouse to rapt attention. Chef Wade Hageman, a protégé of renowned SF/Vegas chef Michael Mina, has imported a similarly complex, labor-intensive style of cooking that appeals as much to the mind as to the senses. He's imported a major Mina

stratagem — showcasing an individual ingredient by presenting it in several different incarnations within the same dish, like musical variations on a theme. Blanca's menu lists each item's pedigree and primary garnishes, but those details don't begin to describe the behind-the-scenes enhancements of marinades, brines, rubs, soaks, and infusions that play subtle roles in the multilayered flavors that come to the table. Appetizers are especially adventurous, the wine list is exceptional (if mainly very pricey), and the restaurant's decor is as modern and polished as the food. Dinner only. Reservations required. Very expensive. — N.W.

**California Bistro** 7100 Four Seasons Point, Carlsbad, 760-603-6868. This restaurant features fresh California cuisine in a beautiful, luxurious hotel dining room. Open 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday to Thursday (to 10:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday). Reserve for the Friday night seafood buffet (5:30 p.m. to 9 p.m.), which includes cooked seafood, sushi, and sashimi. Moderate to expensive. — *E.W.* 

California Pizza Kitchen — Solana Beach Highway 101, Solana Beach, 858-793-0999. Two Beverly Hills lawyers started this chain in 1985 to exploit "the premium pizza segment." Some 150 restaurants later, guess it worked. The place is all shiny chrome, glass, etched palm trees, golden wood and black furniture, and two pizza ovens with real logs burning inside. The Original BBQ chicken pizza, the chain's first hit, is still their top seller. It has barbecue sauce, smoked Gouda and mozzarella cheeses, BBQ chicken, red onions, and cilantro. The BBQ chicken chopped salad is good too, as is the jambalaya. If you've got a sweet tooth, but are em-

barrassed to order "Hawaiian" pizza, try the pear and Gorgonzola. It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions, Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. At night, the Nobel Drive branch features a view of the shining Mormon cathedral. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* 

Joey's Smokin' B-B-Q —

Carmel Valley 4645 Carmel Mountain Road, Carmel Valley, 858-350-1317. Joey Maggiore doesn't produce Southern "O" so much as So-Cal "O" — more an homage to Memphis than anything you'd find in Memphis itself but the tables include paper towel dispensers instead of napkins, a clear signal to go ahead and get messy. All the meats are smoked, not grilled, in true "Q" fashion. Pulled pork offers reasonably credible Memphis-style flavor and tender-chewy texture. Baby back ribs come in three versions; sweet ribs glazed with the "suh-weet" sauce, wet ribs glazed with the mild-spicy sauce, and dry-rubbed ribs sprinkled with spice rub. Sweet or wet are the best. Chicken plates come in a variety of sizes and parts. House-made hot links are well seasoned in the Louisiana manner but extremely salty. The list of sides is long and varied. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W.

Kealani's 137 West D Street, Encinitas, 760-942-5642. Tucked between a 7-Eleven and a pizzeria, with an exterior sign that says "Saimin" (for Hawaii's version of Top Ramen), this island of the Islands prescribes "Living Da Aloha Spirit." A ukulele player sometimes serenades the noonday crowd at the sidewalk tables, and at any hour the food is "plate lunch" — two scoops of short-grain rice, mild house-made macaroni salad, and a

choice of authentic "grines." Don't miss the outstanding kalua pig, zesty, smoky shreds of imu-style roast pork, resembling a moister version of Southern "pulled pork." The menu covers the whole panoply of island standards, from malasadas (Portuguese donuts) to musubi (Spam sushi), with a Saturday special of a luau's worth of "local food." While you're waiting, check out the droll Hawaiian vocabulary lessons under the glass tops of the tables. Open Monday through Saturday, lunch to early dinner. Inexpensive. —

Milton's Deli 2660 Via de la Valle, Del Mar, 858-792-2225. This sprawling, family-friendly eatery started out as a non-kosher Jewish deli, but has come to embrace diner food, pub grub, and Italian and Mexican favorites, along with a full cast of Ashkenazi noshes. Sit down and stuff yourself with stuffed cabbage, overstuffed deli sandwiches, crisp-skinned fat cheese blintzes, matzoh brei, hot brisket with latkes — or chicken-fried steak, if that's your bag. Or take out from the attached deli and bakery. The yummy chopped liver will remind you of the Bronx, the smoked whitefish and silky Nova will take you home to Flatbush, but the soft, cottony bagels — oy!, so goy! Seven days, three meals. Inexpensive to low moderate. — N.W.

The Original 101 Diner 552 First Street, Encinitas, 760-753-2123. This is where the caviar crowd from Rancho Santa Fe comes to remember their roots. It's got all the deliberately down-home cooking you could want, including all-day breakfast ranging from really cheap biscuits and sausage gravy to a pretty cheap top sirloin steak and eggs. For lunch, the bacon-Cheddar burger with fruit is a good surprise combo. The turkey-cranberry salad sandwich is also good, and try the spinach salad, with bacon, feta cheese, olives, mushrooms, and chopped egg. Even though this 101's vintage (1983) in no way compares with the Oceanside 101 Café's (1928), it has become a genuine part of Encinitas life — lines on the weekends

will tell you that. Open for breakfast and lunch daily. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* **Pamplemousse Grille** 514 Via de

Pamplemousse Grille 514 Via de la Valle, Solana Beach, 858-792-9090. The locals' favorite French provincial restaurant offers exquisite, creative cooking. Favorites from an oftenchanging menu include white fish served any style, mushroom cappucini soup, and tarte Tatin. Serene atmosphere with excellent service. Dinner reservations urged. Dinner nightly, lunch Friday only. Dinners expensive.

Poseidon 1670 Coast Boulevard, Del Mar, 858-755-9345. The two dining rooms and bar here boast airy, stylish decor and ocean views, and the SRO umbrella-shaded patio is right at water's edge. Lunches run to sandwiches, burgers, and fried seafood of ordinary competence and uneven preparation: wonderfully coconutty fried shrimp, for example, share a sampler plate with deadly-dry salmon croquettes. Dinner dishes are modern Cal cuisine — that is, a mix-andmatch of Pacific Rim-Mediterranean-Mexican flavors, with some emphasis on seafood. But the view's the thing here. Full bar. Open daily, lunch and dinner; breakfast on weekends. Moderate to expensive. — N.W.

**Roxy Natural Foods Restaurant** North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-436-5001. You don't have to be a Self Realization Fellow ship follower to fit in in Encinitas, but it helps. Roxy was made for the veggie crowd who've grown up around the famous seaside compound. These days, that includes surfers, vegans, and even visiting Hollywood stars picky about their food. Actually, it is no longer strictly a vegetarian eatery: the owners have added chicken and fish for Encinitas's "new people" — the carnivores buying up property in the hills. But the vegan-veggie spirit still rules. Most popular item on the menu is owner Shahram Naimi's own invention: the scrumptious Roxy falafelburger. Its green "meat" is made from garbanzo beans, potatoes, onions, cilantro, and herbs, all bedded down with tomatoes, a thick mat of sprouts,

and melted cheese, covered by a whole-wheat bun. For chicken-lovers, the garlic chicken pizzas sell big-time. Other healthy treats include the three-egg avocado omelet with toast, the artichoke sandwich (with marinated artichoke hearts), and the squash enchilada dinner (steamed banana squash with corn, bell peppers, and low-fat cream cheese in a flour tortilla). Payoff? You come out feeling good and full, not bad and bloated. Open daily, brunch through dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Star of India — Del Mar 3860 Valley Centre Drive, Del Mar, 858-792-1111. It's the lunch buffet that can lead you by the nose into Indian (and here, specifically *Punjabi*) food. Pick among specialties like vegetable *pakora* — a bunch of veggies dipped in chickpea batter and fried — or a nice mess of eggplant with potatoes, chicken curry *masala*, and maybe the first cooked spinach you ever loved, *palak paneer*. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* 

When In Rome 1108 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-1771. This elegant restaurant offers three dining areas and a menu with outstanding appetizers and pasta dishes. There are many unusual preparations. Gorgeous presentation; warm, friendly service. A winner. Dressy-casual crowd. Dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Expensive. — *E.W.* 



Anthony's Fish Grotto — Chula Vista 215 West Bay Boulevard, Chula Vista, 619-425-4200. If you don't want overcomplicated food, Anthony's obliges. Fish and chips is still the simplest and the best. Or Mama's Platter, cod combined with batter-fried calamari, shrimp, oysters, scallops, and clam strips. Anthony's has been up and running for six decades now, with the buying power to get the pick of the catch. The menu offers 18 different seasonal fish to choose from, plus — if you've got the









bread — delicious lobster dishes (in season) like lobster thermidor with a creamy, winey sauce. No reservations. Open daily, lunch through dinner. Moderate. — E.B.

Crown Room 1500 Orange Av enue, Coronado, 619-435-6611. Let's face it, this is one of the grandest entrances you'll make anywhere, into the enormous, gloomy, vaulted timber dining room where presidents, princes and Marilyn Monroe have chowed down. It's only open for Sun-day brunch these days. The gigantic eat-till-vou're-beat buffet feast ranges from omelets to salmon, crab legs, prime rib, dizzying desserts, and even a chocolate fountain for large parties, available upon request. The downside? Monroe was here to shoot Some Like It Hot, but (apart from the chocolate) most food ain't. It's either cold (like the croissants, though the chocolate chunk ones are delicious) or luke-warm (like prime rib and eggs Benedict — and those eggs could do with a lot more Benedict). But this is an Edwardian-scale social occasion — see and be seen. The food isn't great, but the atmosphere is grand. Open Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Expensive.— E.B.

D'Lish Pizza and Pasta 386 East H Street, Suite 211, Chula Vista, 619-585-1371. Also at 2260 Otay Lakes Road. This chain has always prided itself on its Italian/California pastas, pizzas, and salads. Now it has gone carnivorous, adding marinated flank steak and a rib eye to the "bistro en-trées." If you're ordering the flank well-done is a no-no. That will toughen it. But a rare flank is, well, d'lish in its marination and especially its pesto-like chimichurri sauce. Also good: fire-roasted vegetable pizza, where the quick roasting makes for great-tasting, Technicolor-bright broccoli, zucchini, eggplant, and bell peppers. And "Mediterranean chicken lad" works well, partly thanks to the tang of pepperoni chips. Moderate. — *E.B.* 

L'Escale 2000 Second Street, Coronado, 619-435-3000. Probably the pink flamingos and bay views bring

you here first. But L'Escale ("Port of Call" in French) delivers to the taste buds too For "Northern Mediterranean cuisine with California flair, read lots of pasta, fish, salads, sandwiches. Try the grilled salmon *niçoise* salad with its richly sauced fish, crunchy green beans, red potatoes, strong olives, and rosemary-flavored bun. Entrées like grilled chicken and mushrooms in Parmesan cream with penne pasta are safe enough. Or bonein filet mignon. But for sheer architecture, check out the tuna salad sandwich wrapped in lavosh: three vertical Armenian bread tubes, angle-sliced to reveal interiors of tuna and greenery Eat on the pool and bay-surrounded patio if you can. Breakfast, lunch, dinner. Moderate to expensive. — *E.B.* 

La Costa Azul Mariscos 1037 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-691-9812. Great family-run hangout for traditional seafood from Sinaloa and Nayarit, Mexico's crackling-hot desert/coastal states. Their ancient Sinaloa dish aguachile (shrimp in spicy brine) is simple, mouth-siz-zlingly effective, *langostinos* are lush, but maybe most satisfying are whole-fish dishes like *pescado Ver-acruzano*.Truly traditional offerings come in giant three-legged molcajetes. Even their less-traditional signature dish, *Camarones Costa Azul*(crab and cheese-stuffed, bacon-wrapped shrimp) arrives in a burning hot molcaiete Also delicious the sizzle-plate fajitas mixtas, with shrimp, beef, chicken. Many customers come around sunset, just to sit with a cool drink under palm fronds on the patio. Even if you're actually on Chula Vista's Broadway, it feels strangely like Cabo. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. —E.B.

Spiro's Gyros 1201 First Street #4, Coronado, 619-435-1225. The food, the music, the view — are we outside Athens? Is this the Aegean? This inside-outside Greek cafe is located at the water's edge, and the heated patio has a spectacular view of San Diego, the bay, and the boat traffic. At sunset, sipping their excellent Greek wines (cheaper than their California),

watch the sun set the city ablaze in gold. The prices keep Spiro's popular with the locals as well as tourists. Try the moussaka (eggplant casserole) or the souvlaki chicken, marinated in tzatziki sauce, served with tomatoes, onions, and pita bread. Open seven days until 8 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Tango Grille Argentine Steak House 635 Broadway, Chula Vista, the most authentic Argentine parrillada (mixed grill) in town at this charming, warmly decorated bistro about two minutes from the Chula Vista Shopping Center. Fine, smoky wood-grilled Colorado beef appears in several unusual cuts (including succulent steak-cut short-ribs). You can choose from two different mixed grills (sized for one or two), the first with conventional meats, the other - the more adventurous - includes organ meats and blood sausage. For starters, there are brilliantly seasoned miniempanadas of amazing lightness, as well as several interesting salads. Those not in a grilled-meat mood can opt for numerous pastas (including a big, meaty lasagna) or the ubiquitous milanesa (breaded beef or chicken patties) of the pampas. Portions are more than generous, and so are the flavors. Open daily. Low moderate.

# **Blood and Ghosts**

Two and a half hours are a long time to spend in the company of such a man.

omehow, somewhere, in my month-long move from Domicile A to Domicile B, my inthe-dark notes and first draft for a critique of *There Will Be Blood* got mislaid, lost, most likely twist-tied

into a Hefty bag and sent off to the landfill. So you will just have to take my word for it that the scribblings con-

tained many trenchant observations cogently stated. All I can dredge up from muddy memory (I saw it at the end of November) is the remainder of this paragraph. Based loosely, so they say, on Oil!, a muckraking, boatrocking, banned-in-Boston novel by Upton Sinclair (a writer partial to exclamation points in his titles), the film is a kind of anti-epic, an anti-Giant, about a miserly, misanthropic, nothing short of murderous American oil man in the first decades of the last century: warped beyond recognition as an exemplar of the enterprising capitalist. (The accompanying music credited to Jonny Greenwood of the British rock group Radiohead, edgy, skittery, dissonant, helps set the tone: not music to Build an Empire By, such as a Dimitri Tiomkin or a Max Steiner might have composed, but instead

music to Squirrel Away Nuts for the Winter By.) The hard dirty work, at the outset, of digging a well all by his lonesome is vividly and wordlessly captured by writer-director Paul Thomas Anderson, yet it's hardly

adequate to explain or excuse the character's subsequent aberrance, and his particular animus towards a hayseed

faith healer (the initially very young and insufficiently aging Paul Dano), each of whom has his own inflexible reasons for not deferring to the other: the Self-Made Man versus the Man of God. Daniel Day-Lewis, ever the risktaker, even if the risk (immurement in Victorian melodrama) is much the same as in Gangs of New York, makes of the protagonist a real and repellently compelling figure when he's not breaking the spell with his John Huston rollercoaster cadences. (Why would this depraved money-grubber, we keep asking ourselves, be impersonating the director of The Maltese Falcon, Treasure of the Sierra Madre, whatever?) But two and a half hours, if all we're going to do is gape, are a long time to spend in the company of such a man, a good hour or more too long. There will, as promised, be blood,

though not any time soon, and never all that much.

The Orphanage, under the Wes Craven-like imprint of Guillermo del Toro (Cronos, Mimic, Pan's Labyrinth, et al.), but under the actual direction of novice J.A. Bayona, is a Spanish ghost story that strives at all times to stay within arm's reach of ambiguity — real ghosts or overheated

imagination? — in the mold of the Henry James prototype, *The Turn of the Screw*, or at any rate in the mold of the academic squabbles over it. James, as I recollect, set out to write a straightforward ghost story, but was, bless his unsullied soul, incapable of it. Bayona is no James, nor is he even a Jack Clayton, the judicious filmmaker who turned *The Turn...* into

The Innocents on screen. So few horror films these days exercise a measure of restraint, so few set their sights anywhere but on topping their forerunners, that it's easy to overvalue one that does. The basic situation without doubt seems primed for "resonance," and the lead actress, Belén Rueda, seems primed almost for spontaneous combustion. An adopted orphan re-

turns to the palatial orphanage thirty years later, with plans to reopen it, and with an adopted, HIV-positive orphan of her own. The boy, already inclined towards imaginary playmates, appears to have made contact with the ghosts of half a dozen children still hanging about the place, and soon goes missing. His mother then goes bananas. Bayona's tightwire act of trying to walk a line of psychological subtlety while also trying to keep genre addicts on the hook tends to make the obligatory jolts feel all the more forced and factitious: the premonitory music, the startling noises, the creaking hinges, the magnified eyes of the prune-faced old lady behind her cokebottle lenses, the fingers slammed in the bathroom door and the backward jackknife into the tub, the plowedover pedestrian and the gruesome makeup on the carcass. Through all that, we are apt to remain, in common with the rational husband and policewoman, unconvinced and unmoved. Ambiguity will have that effect. The climax, when the heroine is at last left alone in the house, nevertheless crams in two or three good shivers, but it goes on three or four steps too far.

P.S. I Love You, a Christmas release, can still be found around town if you're interested in whether a twotime Academy Award-winning actress, Hilary Swank, can lighten herself into the thespian weight-class of a Sandra Bullock or a Kate Hudson. The answer, you will find, is no, not when the director and co-writer, Richard LaGravenese, who directed her also in Freedom Writers, is intent on sniffing out pockets of genuine emotion in a mechanical tearjerker (and laughjerker) about a turning-thirty widow who learns to live again under the guidance of pre-written missives from her dear departed, Gerard Butler, a life-loving, beer-chugging Irish minstrel. ("Why," she wonders in front of the TV screen one night, "can't I be Bette Davis?" — another two-time Academy Award-winner, but an unequalled ten-time nominee.) Swank may not be able, in a flashback to the meet-cute, to look quite like a college coed on her first tour of Europe, but she can touchingly act like one, and remind us in the process that one of her rarest gifts is her totally uncool enthusiasm. Kathy Bates, merely a one-time Academy Award-winner, has her moments, too, as Swank's sourpuss mother. The initial layout of the situation is cleverly and deftly done, with a lengthy pre-credits sequence of a marital spat and détente, an off-screen death during the credits, and then straight into the wake without warning. And the continuing visibility of the yummy hubby in the apartment and in flashbacks might do something to placate the spectator who felt shortchanged on ghosts in The Orphanage, as well as do something to persuade the skeptic of their existence. Anyone remembered is a ghost. ■

**Across the Universe** — Two-and-aquarter-hour promo for the Beatles without ever mentioning them by name. A generous, even overgenerous sampler of their songs (thirty-three of them, by the count in the press notes, leaving aside the numberless others that are quoted from or alluded to) has been re-recorded, or "covered" as they say in the business, by a fictitious cast of characters plunked down against the billowing backdrop of the Sixties: the war, the draft, the protests, the drugs, the psychedelics, the Sexual Revolution, all that. To link the Beatles with the upheaval makes a certain sense. Unlike, say, the more enduring Rolling Stones or the goingnowhere Dave Clark Five, the Beatles were a group that really did evolve (or, as some would prefer, devolve) swiftly and dramatically, making them a useful weathercock for the winds of change. You are here reminded afresh of their range and their riches; and in new mouths, you hear the songs with new ears. (The tremulous, down-tempo rendition, for example, of "I Wanna Hold Your Hand" by an Asian American high-school cheerleader, T.V. Carpio, brings the song a new, a renewed feeling, all by itself almost worth the price of admission.) By the second half, however, the inspiration irreversibly runs out of steam en route to a spluttering climax of "All You Need Is Love." (Wearily, now: yeah, yeah,) Part of the problem is that, as the counterculture gains momentum in the sequence of events, there's a visible increase in music-video vulgarity, ornamental surrealism, Fellini-esque fantasy, all the elements that go into director Julie Taymor's fabled "vision." Another part of the problem may be that the later songs, even though the playlist in the film does not observe a strict chronology, tend to be more turgid. Part, too, may simply be that two-and-a-quarter hours are too long for a promo. With Evan Rachel Wood, Jim Sturgess, Joe Anderson, Dana Fuchs, Martin Luther McCov, and cameos by Bono, Eddie Izzard, Joe Cocker, Salma Hayek.

American Gangster — Formula underworld drama poured into an epic template. Like Jiffy-brand waffle batter spread over an iron the size of a billiard table. "Based on a true story," it traces, in separate intertwined storylines, the converging upward paths of criminal and cop: the former (Denzel Washington) starting out as the servile driver and bodyguard for the legendary Bumpy Johnson, a big fish in the small pond of Harlem into the late Sixties, then expanding the pond, upon his boss's death, into an ocean; and the latter (Russell Crowe) working his way up as an undercover narc in New Jersey, studying for the bar in his spare time. Their eventual meeting comes, and drags on, as something of an anticlimax, after an excitingly staged drug raid from which the ganglord is lucky to be absent. The opposing paths up to that point are smoothly graded and well greased; and director Ridley Scott, the epitome of slick (Alien, Blade Runner, Thelma and Louise, Gladiator, Black Hawk Down, and so on), moves things along at a tolerable pace, although there's the distinct impression that even if he knew any shortcuts. he wouldn't take them. His goal is epic, and he would gladly drag his feet to get there. At two and a half hours plus, he indeed does get there. Washington, to pay him a backhanded compliment, is never quite as credible as a through-and-through baddie, even though that seems to be the way to the Oscar (i.e., Training Day). Crowe on the other hand is a perfectly credible crusader, overcoming no greater obstacles on the road to respectability than his buoyant white sneakers and his unflattering, inexpensive



(A mole on the right cheek links the three different actresses who play the role, Saoirse Ronan in the Thirties, Romola Garai in wartime, and Vanessa Redgrave in modern day.) The movie starts rather se-

dately, despite some point-of-view tricks, in a commonplace country estate; and it then gets rather overblown in the war sequences, including a marathon Steadicam single take of the evacuation at Dunkirk. #### Before the Devil Knows You're

**Dead** — Interesting attempt by the eightythree-year-old Sidney Lumet to keep up with the Tarantinos, piloting a caper film of back-and-forth time jumps and alternating points of view. The caper itself, a jewelry store stickup, is strictly small-time. "We don't want Tiffany's," the mastermind, a drug-dependent real estate accountant (Philip Seymour Hoffman), pitches the idea to his younger brother, a deadbeat dad (Ethan Hawke): "We want a mom-and-pop operation." More specifically, the operation of their own mom and pop (Rosemary Harris and Albert Finney), squeezed between Claire's and Foot Locker in a cookiecutter Westchester shopping mall. The robbery goes very wrong very early, and the ensuing time scramble dispenses information and revelations on an unpredictable schedule. We meet "Grandma," for example, at a school play after we have seen her shot in the holdup and before we find out she was not supposed to be at work that day. And we find out that the recruited younger brother is having an affair with his sister-in-law, the mastermind's wife (Marisa Tomei, more extensively attractive than ever), before we even know that the mastermind has any part in the plan. The

totally botched robbery, leaving no prospect of success and profit, quickly eliminates much of the standard suspense in this sort of thing (cueing instead a brooding Fargo-esque musical score from Fargo's actual composer, Carter Burwell), and it permits the focus to shift to the

deeply jaundiced view of family life - family discord, family disloyalty, family dysfunction. That view, while it lets in a fair share of malicious humor, is not to be taken lightly. Lumet, whose long list of credits runs along the lines of Twelve Angry Men, Long Day's Journey into Night, Fail-

Charlie Wilson's War — Didactic polisci lesson on How the System Works, entertainingly illustrated by screenwriter Aaron Sorkin and director Mike Nichols. The titular war is the one between the Soviets and the Afghans in the Reagan era, and Charlie Wilson is a nonfictional Texas congressman (played with supreme complacency by Tom Hanks) who, ideally situated for budgeting purposes, spared some time from his enjoyment of the perks of power (single malt, cocaine, strippers in the hot tub) in order to do the bidding of a rabid Right-wing fundraiser in his home state (Julia Roberts, fully surrendering to her natural or enhanced grotesquerie, at one point intrepidly separating her gluey eyelashes with an open safety pin) and broker a covert alliance between the Pakistanis and the Israelis, combatting the Evil Empire from discreetly behind the scenes. This is not your typical tale of the cavalier cynic getting involved, finding religion, committing himself to a cause. The protagonist's profligate ways are typical enough, and the refugee camp that opens his eyes is depicted very straight, but there remains, even after that, a sense of irony about his crusade no more solemnity in his demeanor than in that, let's say, of the surgeons in MASHso that his commitment is forever perceived as something of a pose, something within quotation marks. The job gets done all the same. Philip Seymour Hoffman, sporting a lush mustache and full head of dark hair in testimony to the character's Mediterranean ethnicity, goes Hanks one better (several better, in fact) as a disgruntled CIA spook who, irked at not getting the Finland assignment after studying Finnish, cannot even throw a tantrum without a wink. Not only does Hoffman walk away with the show, he also gets to recite the Buddhist parable whose punchline frames the entire picture, turning an ostensibly happy ending into an up-in-the-air ending, or in other words no ending at all. We know too well what happened next. The Darjeeling Limited — One thing to be said for a Wes Anderson film, and it's no small thing, is that it bears an individual stamp. A stamp as flat as a postage stamp, as emphatic as a rubber stamp. (Whap, whap.) A well-known commodity after Bottle Rocket, Rushmore, The Royal Tennenbaums, The Life Aquatic of Steve Zissou, Anderson favors fastidiously balanced, nailed-down compositions, the figures pinned to a shallow background like butterfly specimens. Stressing their separateness, he has no intention to hinge his shots together into a smooth and seamless line. but instead slots them into place as if on disconnected planes, setting up a clumping rhythm of starts and stops, glazing the screen with the deadest of deadpans, and erecting an invisible wall (invulnerable even to the occasional uncharacteristic zoom) between the filmmaker and his characters, freakishly feckless people, abject puppets manipulated by a man with little regard for human diversity and volition. The effect the unhumanness of these humanoids — is often amusing and always distancing. The danger in the director's method is that it can be too distancing and therefore not amusing enough. (Since he always clamps a tasteful mute on the audience's merriment, the standard laugh-meter is an unreliable

#### The Diving Bell and the Butterfly —

Julian Schnabel relates another true-life tale from the wide world of art, this one a little more liberated from convention than his Basquiat or his Before Night Falls (though it immediately and continually brings to mind Alejandro Amenábar's The Sea Inside), the tale of Jean-Dominique Bauby, an editor at Elle magazine, who in the prime of life suffered a stroke that left him paralyzed but for his left eyelid (and his imagination and his memory), and who dictated a memoir, letter by letter, through a system of blinks. The first three-quarters of an hour or so are reasonably audacious, subjectively visualized through the eyes of the invalid (Mathieu Amalric, at this point unseen), with cropped faces and figures, blurred edges, off-kilter angles, etc., and yet the camera looks awfully free-swinging and the editing awfully jumpy for the P.O.V. of a paralytic, as if Schnabel felt he had to lend a helping hand to keep things hopping. (The rotation of comely coquettes to serve as speech therapist, physical therapist, and amanuensis seems to have been assembled out of similar motives.) Much of the remainder of the film feels drawn out and padded, with the major exception of a tense scene in which the wife, operating the speakerphone in the hospital room, is required to mediate a call from the mistress. The essential subject matter is one that demands in its treatment purity and rigor, and that receives instead disorder and indulgence. (This really wasn't the time and place for further proof of the director's hip taste in music, U2, Velvet Underground, Tom Waits.) A big critical favorite. nonetheless, perhaps owing to the special

I'm Not There — Todd Haynes blows another cloud of mist into the mystique of Bob Dylan. The filmmaker, who once enlisted Barbie dolls to tell the Karen Carpenter story, now borrows a gimmick used by Todd Solondz in Palindromes, employing a rotation of dissimilar actors to play a single role, a multiplication of a gimmick used by Luis Buñuel in That Obscure Object of Desire. (Not a gimmick, in other words, exclusive to filmmakers named Todd.) The fact that Bob Dylan is a real person and a public figure, about whom we may have our own ideas, further complicates matters, and it is easy to lose track of the subject of the film when we are looking at a prepubescent black boy, Marcus Carl Franklin, hopping freight trains in Depression-period hobostyle, or looking at Richard Gere in granny

glasses on horseback in the era of the model-T, and all the easier when they are masquerading under the aliases of Woody Guthrie and Billy the Kid, respectively. The songs in the film (sometimes sung by Dylan himself, sometimes by others) leave no doubt as to the protagonist's identity, and no doubt as to his uniqueness, but between the half-dozen different faces and pseudonyms, the film seems to be not so much about the "many lives of Bob Dylan" as about a half-dozen different lives altogether. The elusiveness of the man, the multifacetedness of him, would presumably be The Point, but that point could have been made more subtly: the dissimilarity of Marcus Carl Franklin and Richard Gere amounts to gross overstatement. Adding to the confusion is a visual patchwork stitched together out of grainy black-and-white, glossy black-and-white, jaundiced color, and peachy color (Edward Lachman, cinematographer), not even counting the diverse cinematic allusions, catch them if you can, to Fellini, Godard, Peckinpah. With Christian Bale (who gets the speaking voice, the cadence, just right), Cate Blanchett (who additionally, cross-dressingly, gets the look just right), Ben Winshaw, Heath Ledger, and Charlotte Gainsbourg. 2007.

Juno — A slow starter. In the title role of a

pregnant Minnesota high-schooler (named after the Roman goddess of marriage, fidelity, fertility), the dry flat sardonic linedelivery of Ellen Page, the angelic avenger of *Hard Candy*, is not easy to warm up to, no matter how much we might try to see it as an adolescent defense mechanism, or how much as humble emulation of Janeane Garofalo. And the garishly colorful dialogue, from first-time scripter and former stripper Diablo Cody, often tends to push too hard ("Being pregnant makes me pee like Seabiscuit"). The heroine, interested in simply finding a good home for the baby, not in making a profit off it, finds a possible taker in the weekly PennySaver ("next to the exotic birds"), a neat-freaky suburban couple in the gated confines of Glacial Vallev Estates. It's there that things really begin to get interesting. Our initial arrival at the housing development is alone sufficient to convince us of Jason Reitman's directorial bona fides: a series of static shots of antiseptic House Beautiful after House Beautiful as the car passes across the screen, left to right, in front of each. And the prospective mother, Jennifer Garner (her piano-wire tautness put to good use), turns out to be the neater of the pair, someone who will studiously ponder "custard" versus "cheesecake" as the color for baby's room, while the prospective father, Jason Bateman, proves to be the freakier, a stay-athome composer of advertising ditties and a frustrated rock-and-roller. A curious, potentially dangerous after-school relationship blossoms between him and the heroine: he may be a commercial sell-out as a composer, but he's a person who can talk music to a teenager, and he demonstrates "decent taste in slasher movies" (e.g., Herschell Gordon Lewis's The Wizard of Gore, another impediment to our warming up to the heroine). Over time, the film builds, and it does so with proficiency, patience, and foresight. If the heroine is never wholly embraceable, the surrounding characters go far to compensate, specifically J.K. Simmons as her droll laconic dad, Allison Janney as her worldly-wise, even-keeled mom, and above all, Michael Cera as her shuntedaside, unassertive, but ever-faithful boyfriend, the baby's biological father, and a cooler dude than you'd ever guess from his track-team togs. And if the dialogue is unabatingly overcolored, at least the hues

The Kite Runner — From the Khaled Hosseini novel, directed by Marc Forster (Finding Neverland, Stranger Than Fiction), a story about a storyteller, and in large part a story truly worthy of a storyteller. The remaining parts are hackneyed and/or hokey. Main elements: two boyhood pals in Kabul, 1978, the sons of master and servant, and the psychologically penetrating betrayal of the second by the first, our evolving storyteller. Notwithstanding the graphic barbarities of the Taliban in the year 2000, the film takes a tactical and tactful approach to the Islamic topic, and the nostalgic re-creation of life in the Afghanistan of yesteryear (handsomely photographed in the bargain) is highly beneficial: the competitive, combative, and colorful kite flying, the Pashtodubbed print of The Magnificent Seven (Charles Bronson's accent giving him away as a native Iranian), the swanky comforts of the hero's home, the imposing figure of his principled, civilized, dignified father (ably embodied by the star of Taste of Cherry, Homayoun Ershadi), destined to run a gas station in Fremont after fleeing the Soviet invaders. The besetting problems of dividing a screen role between a younger and an older actor are brutally spotlighted in the scene where a Taliban bully tells the now adult hero that he never forgets a face, when in truth the face little resembles the one that the bully last saw. No Country for Old Men — The Coen brothers' first literary adaptation, from a Cormac McCarthy original, an overflowingly bloody pulp thriller, plumped up with folksy first-person social commentary in italics, about a Texas good ole boy who stumbles upon the internecine scene of a drug deal gone bad, makes off with a satchel of cash, and tries to ditch the implacable hired killer (among others) on his trail. Sharing the writing credit as always and sharing the directing credit as they only began to do with The Ladykillers, the brothers were smart to cut down the social commentary - the Decline of Western Civilization as viewed by an aging third-generation lawman — to a single block of voice-over at the outset ("Some of the old-time sheriffs never even wore a gun"), and to sprinkle any additional such commentary lightly into the dialogue



("Once you quit hearing 'sir' and 'ma'am," the rest is soon to follow"). Without those repeated and repetitive interruptions, the simple pursuit narrative — the killer pursuing the filcher, the lawman pursuing — unfolds as lean, linear, streamlined, and yet slow, steady, and long, never very deep. And on the Coens' part, never very inventive. They have followed McCarthy's blueprint scrupulously, even slavishly, and have bountifully harvested his lip-smacking dialogue; and the major unconventionalities in this mostly conventional thriller are all his. (For better or for worse.) To be sure, the Coens are meticulous technicians, supremely skillful, attentive to the minutest detail. And while the body count climbs numbingly high, the tension in individual set pieces is teased out to an exquisite agony, and with no artificial boost from

### **Cutting-Edge Science**

Males Will Be Males: University of Lausanne (Switzerland) researchers discovered that not only are cichlid fish oriented to "oral sex" (because the female stores fertilizable eggs in her mouth) but that studlier males have evolved a trick to get females to open up: Super-procreative males create egg-like growths on their fins, which females imagine are their own missing eggs and try to suck them up, thus improving the male's opportunity to slip sperm in, according to a November report in New Scientist.

• A research team led by Richard Hanson of Case Western Reserve University (Cleveland) has produced a colony of "supermice" whose physical abilities are the rodent equivalent of those of gifted humans. By modifying a single metabolism gene, researchers enhanced the mouse's ability

to use body fat for energy, creating a mouse that can run five hours without stopping, live longer, and have three times as much sex as ordinary mice. According to Hanson, humans have exactly the same modifiable gene, but "this is not something that you'd do to a human. It's completely wrong.

(1) Ryan Holle, 25, is serving a life sentence (with no possibility of parole) in Florida even though his only connection to a 2003 murder was that he loaned his car to one of the killers. According to a December New York Times report, Florida, even when dispensing its second-worst punishment of all, does not restrict "aiding and

abetting" to just those who consciously assist a murder. (2) Scott Masters, 41, faced a potential 30-year sentence for shoplifting a doughnut in a Farmington, Mo., convenience store in September because, as he exited the store, he pushed a worker aside. Prosecutors said that "assault" made the crime a "strong-arm robbery" (but in December, a judge decided 90 days in jail was more appropriate).





### HOMECOMING

Hours grew into days, days into weeks, weeks into months, and yet time gives me the illusion that it was just a few days ago when my illness began. Ah! Time had ceased to exist then, as thoughts of my ill health entirely consumed my mind. But I realize now, when I am regaining my health, that my illness was just a clever ploy by time to secretly make a fool of me, quietly ticking, laughing away all the while, tricking me behind my back to hand me back to my parents for the second time in my life.

"Eighteen months of medications, physical therapy, and rest," is what the doc said. Foolish doc. He didn't know what he was saying. It meant giving up my job and having to be babysat. It meant a complete wreck of a semblance of the normalcy a closeted gay tried creating far away from expectations. It meant running back crying to mama, just like when I was a kid, forcing me again to be a part of her dream plans for me — just like old times. "Don't worry, you'll make a full recovery," the doc added with a smile. Foolish, foolish doc. How could he smile when he was giving me such a grim prognosis? I was back to where I had started without a cure and he was smiling. This doc was mad. I wanted to run away, but I was in a wheelchair and even standing up was difficult. Mama was maneuvering the wheelchair from behind, and I knew she knew only one way to go — toward home, family, a wife for her only son, grandkids, heaven. She didn't know that she was taking home a devil from hell who wanted to spoil her carefully manicured Garden of Eden.

Home. I never really moved out of my parents' home, but I made sure that I was never there. Work was my excuse. Earn-

ing money, which I never really cared about, became the perfect pretext to attain some sense of freedom. Traveling the whole year round gave me the normalcy away from customary life. Small hotel rooms and cramped company quarters gave me the breathing spaces I needed. I have always chosen the discomfort of a seat on a bus or an airplane over my bed at home, suspicious of any expectations my bed might have in exchange for the comfort it gives me. Often, selfish goals have led one to unintended greater heights, a bigger name. My narrow intentions let me become an employer's dream, a selfless hardworking employee willing to sacrifice home for the company's sake. Ha! Selfish is altruistic, and "home sweet home" is a scary home.

Mama. She once had another son, and I once had an elder brother. I was just another son then, until my brother died of an overdose. After going through rehabilitations and relapses with my brother for many years, his death killed something inside Mama. Her only consolation was me, her other

seedling. Suddenly, I was under the spotlight. Ha! Invisible became visible — a gay was left to carry on the family name.

Closeted gays are visible, yet invisible. They are, but they are not. They are plants that hide their fruits deep underneath the ground. The green leaves above are just pretenses, false promises of flowers and fruits on their



stems, lest it breaks the gardener's heart. It is not easy to forget the nurturing, the love, the care, and the hope of the gardener toward that sapling; a spurious existence is much better than truth, shame, disappointments, tears, and pain.

It was a frustrating first few weeks coming back after hospitalization. I shouted at night in exasperation after

trying for many hours to get up. Mama would come running, her reassuring hands wiping away my frustrated tears, skillfully hiding her own compassionate tears. But the situation improved dramatically within a few weeks. Though weak, I was soon walking again. More recently, I got a call from A.K., a gay friend (read: secret lover). He came from

> Delhi and wanted to see me over dinner. I told Mama that I was going out to meet a friend. When I came out of my room, Mama was knitting in the living room, her eyes proudly looking at me all dressed up. When I worked the car out of the garage, she was attending

some flowers on the porch, but her eyes were still on me. When I was on the road, those eyes were there in the rear-view mirror, telling me that she, her hope, and her expectations will be waiting for me. I stepped up the gas and speeded toward my gay lover. Mama, I am not home



He discovered my humanity, warts writ large, and only my death can redeem me.

Thank God it's January. All of January is the New Year, I'd say, and the equivalent of a Saturday morning on a closeup of a calendar. In this case, this January, it is a Saturday that has followed a kind of nightmare weekend — that being the end of August (in all its optimism)through its end, this morning.

I'm sitting in my son's apartment in San Marcos again, with a cast on my ankle, a walker next to me, and a son who finds nothing but fault with his idiot, character-debased father. Outside the rain is falling on the dead and dead alike in this town. I am in the very heart of that karmic territory when one finds oneself saying, "Well, the upside is that things certainly can't get any worse." Only I find that the Fates love to crack each other up this way, by provoking mortals to actually believe this.

I'll refrain from discussing the necessity for the cast and walker because I have this overwhelming certainty that readers are sick of hearing about my medical problems (though this one had nothing to do with alcohol), and I say only that there is much pain involved. This does nothing to help my equanimity toward my sons resentments. And what could those be? "Walking around." Meaning the cumbersome walker.

I would love to return to writing

about "events," stuff to do or stuff other people do with their Friday nights. Other people, period. But to do so would inevitably involve a tale originating from the next hospital bed, and there we'd be again. I could maybe do a column on how nurses spend their Friday nights at the nurses station, but that would only be the flimsiest of ruses, though at least it wouldn't necessarily be about me.

Some recent mail included an e-mail my publisher wouldn't show me (he may have rightly assumed that it would depress me into a non-work mode, just as I'm able to get back to a computer and all), the e-mail said, in effect, that Brizzolara is a hopeless loser. But other correspondence included an invitation from a man named McCarthy, a complete stranger, who invited me to stay with him at his place in Oceanside over the holidays if I found I had no other place to go. Yet another anonymous Christmas card, with no return address and a prematurely shredded postmark, included words of support, political sympathy, and a \$20 bill. I have no means of returning it, but thank you, sir, and God bless. I assure you the money will go somewhere it can do some good and not to some liquor bottler.

It's true enough that the digits 2-0-0-8 are arbitrary in meaning, unless you're into numerology, which is crap. But one can impose one's own order on them. I will use them as a demarcation code for taking better care of my health and turning around some bad habits. If I am even halfway successful, 2008 will be a good year — or at least a better year.

In the meantime, this year will be the first in which I am an unqualified reprobate to my son. Not the loveable, avuncular reprobate everyone allows for, but an unredeemable character of generically low order. Previously there has always been some kind of illusion on his part that there was something of the truly good man about me; but he has arrived at that rite of passage where "My Dad" has become and forever will be "My f—-ing father." He discovered my humanity, warts writ large, and only my death can redeem me and emphasize fond and noble memories, in some cases even a kind of hagiography. I did pretty much the same thing with my father.

Of course my son is to a large degree very different, considering his mental state: always highly changeable. In fact, last night, during a brief cease-fire on his part (I rarely shoot back, though he believes he's under attack from me) he confessed, "Dad, I don't know what to do with my emotions lately." For the past



five years he has known exactly what to do with them, and that is bury them, don't experience them, and sidestep them in a way I often wish I could do. When I tried to tell him this might well be a sign of recovery, and that everyone experiences this at one time or another, his reaction was to arch his back on the bed, clutch his head and moan, "No. No. No. There is nothing good or normal about this." I was missing the point completely and reaffirming his emerging opinion of me as perverse and wrong-headed.

After having generously invited me here until my foot heals, he is, within hours, having serious regrets and is already angling for ways for the return of his role-playing-game buddy/roommate. The sight of me hobbling around on a walker is clearly disconcerting to him: another indication of rotten humanity and anything but power.

The king must die.
