**Wings clipped** The 1990 Gulfstream IV executive jet owned by David Copley's once-proud Copley Newspaper chain, which is still trying to unload the

Union-Tribune, is on the block. The luxurious aircraft — used by Copley to

transport himself back and forth to New York shows and vacations in the Mediterranean and Caribbean on his \$30 million yacht Happy Days — is being advertised on the Internet by Bloomer deVere Group Avia, Inc., a Camarillobased airplane broker. Would-be buyers are advised to "make offer"; similar models go for around \$20 million. G-IVs can carry up to 20 passengers in standard configuration, but the Copley plane is outfitted for just 12, according to a description of the interior. The plane features spacious galleys forward and aft, both with microwave ovens. The "Airshow 400" information center includes a 20-inch TV up front and a 12-inch screen in back. There is an RCA VCR player and a DVD player with an iPod jack, along with a Sony ten-CD changer. The craft also comes with a Tempus Med-Alert system with portable patient monitor, presumably installed for Copley, who has had a heart transplant.

**In transit** Democrat **Lori Saldaña** is busy campaigning for reelection to her third term in

the state assembly, representing the 76th District, which covers such San Diego neighborhoods as Point Loma, Pacific Beach, and Clairemont. With GOP Log Cabin club member **Ralph Denney** on the ballot against her in the safe Democratic district, she's regarded as a sure winner,

even given the slow meltdown in Sacramento over the stalled state budget. Reflecting Saldaña's confidence is the fact that her campaign website. lorisaldana.com ("I believe people want a clean world to live in. We want a clean coastline. Clean water. Clean Air. And, of course, we want our government to be clean") hasn't been updated since her campaign of two years ago. But term limits prevent Saldaña from running a fourth time, and like most elected officials who apparently have nothing better to do than maintain an iron grip on elective office, she's already on the hunt for a new gig. So even before the November results are in, Saldaña has set up a new campaign committee, "Lori Saldaña for California," with the goal of winning in 2010 the District Three seat on the state Board of Equalization now held by Republican Michelle Steel of Orange County, who was elected in 2006, beating fringe Democrat Mary Christian-Heising of La Jolla. Steel bills herself as "the country's highest ranking Korean-American officeholder and California's highest ranking Republican woman." Saldaña's move was disclosed in a filing with the California secretary of state dated September 7. Questions lodged at Saldaña's office were not responded to by press time.

Keeping it in the family As a result of gerrymandering by the state legislature, San Diego's congressional incumbents don't have much to fear in their quest for reelection this fall. Democrats Susan Davis and Bob Filner, along with Republicans Brian Bilbray and Darrell Issa, are all assured an easy, almost certain path to victory. And the only seat being vacated this year belongs to the GOP's retiring Duncan L. Hunter, whose son, conveniently named Duncan D. Hunter, is running to replace him and appears to be a similar shoo-in. But the delegation hasn't stopped raising and spending a lot of campaign money on some eye-catching items, including payments to family members.

Take the case of Brian Bilbray, who through the middle of this year had already spent \$534,869 on a variety of goods and services. They included \$1978 for a "political retreat" run by the Congressional Institute; a \$3600 tab at the French Gourmet for a fund-raiser; fees of \$12,500 paid to San Diego lawyer **David King**; \$8647 for air fare on United; and \$5243 to the White House Historical Association for "gifts to contributors." Of course, what would a good campaign be without some down-home self-dealing? Twelve thousand twenty-eight dollars was paid to the family-owned Bilbray Tax Service.

For his part, Democrat Filner spent a total of \$806,079, including \$36,173 for catering at the unionized Mission Bay Hilton and \$1081 at the National Democratic Club in Washington. And, like his across-the-aisle colleague Bilbray, Filner is famous for helping out the family.

Back in December 2005, the *Union-Tribune* bashed Filner for paying consulting company Campaign Resources, owned by his wife, **Jane Merrill**, \$505,000 for fund-raising over the previous decade. The story emerged after **Juan Vargas**, a fellow Democrat who was running against Filner, discovered the arrangement. Six months later, Vargas lost his 2006 primary challenge to the incumbent. Following that, the *U-T* apparently lost interest in the story and never wrote another word about it, but Merrill's

outfit is still pulling down some sizable cash. From January to July of this year, the Filner camp paid Campaign Resources a total of \$28,000, about \$4000 a month, except for March when the firm collected just \$1000 and February when it got \$3000.

Fellow Democrat Susan

Davis, occupying arguably the safest-of-thesafest Democratic seats, still managed to spend \$340,823. Twenty thousand dollars went to Grove Insight, run by **Lisa Grove**, a colorful Democratic pollster from Portland, Oregon, who sports a big question mark tattooed onto her left shoulder and has worked for everyone from big labor to **Al Gore** in 1988 to liberal ex—Colombian president **César Gaviria**.

#### Quadrillion

ne quadrillion. That's 1,000,000,000,-000,000 — one plus 15 zeroes, or one thousand trillion. It is incomprehensible.

And that's what's terrifying. This summer, the Bank for International Settlements, the bank for the world's central banks, estimated that the face value of derivatives floating around the world is \$1.14 quadrillion. Derivatives are incredibly complex securities whose value is derived from some asset such as a bond, a stock, or a currency. They are used to bet on the weather and upcoming inflation, among many things. But derivatives aren't really assets; they are crapshoots on the value of the underlying securities — a wager on another wager. They are based almost completely on borrowed money. And all too many are held by the nation's largest banks and investment banks — yeah, one of those places where you may have parked your money.

Over the weekend, Lehman Brothers went into bankruptcy, Merrill Lynch exchanges, and \$596 trillion are over-the-counter derivatives that are basically unregulated and, essentially, unmonitored. They are traded in a chaotic marketplace in which record keeping is sloppy. Of that \$1.14 quadrillion of derivatives, \$548 trillion are listed derivatives, or ones that are traded on organized tives are "financial weapons of mass destruction." And that's just what savvy economists and analysts fear: a financial nuclear reaction, with one institution after another failing after one party can't meet its obligations. #### **An Olympic Moment**

acob Blumenfeld delivered what was arguably the most courageous performance by a San Diegan at the recent Beijing

Olympics. And he didn't compete in swimming, track and field, or gymnastics but in the far more dangerous game of international protest politics.

Like hundreds of thousands of international tourists, Blumenfeld, who grew up in Del Cerro and the College Area and attended San Diego Jewish Academy and Patrick Henry High School, flew to Beijing during the Olympics. He looked forward to seeing the bustling capital and to sampling food from its street vendors. He was disappointed. "I didn't see any poor people or vendors in the streets," he says. "They'd all been pushed out of the city for the Olympics."

But street food wasn't Blumenfeld's real reason to visit China. On August 19, at 11:48 p.m., he and four collaborators displayed a banner in the plaza outside the Beijing National Stadium, better known as the Bird's Nest. It wasn't just any banner. The canvas sign stretched 15 feet from end to end and stood about 4 feet tall. The 3-foot English lettering, done in hundreds of blue lightemitting diodes, spelled out "FREE TIBET." The right side of the banner bore the same message in Chinese characters.

In a video of the event, posted at freetibet2008.org,

Blumenfeld's silhouette can be seen holding up the right side of the banner. In the background stands the illuminated Bird's Nest. Above the center of the banner looms a three-pillared tower capped by the Olympic rings. The video is only 20 seconds long because that's all the time it took for Chinese authorities to show up, tear down the banner, and arrest Blumenfeld and his associates. (The cameraman, who was filming without lights from 50 or so feet away, escaped detection by the authorities.)

'We didn't expect to hold it for very long," Blumenfeld, now a doctoral student in

a Free Tibet, weren't allowed to leave. "They took our banner down," Blumenfeld recalls, "and they kept us on that spot. It was pretty late, so they cleared the park of anyone that wasn't police. And they had tons of people taking pictures of us - police photographers, I think. So we just sat there. We had a phone on us, so we used it. We were talking to the media and our organization. We were doing interviews on what we were doing and why we were doing it, talking about Tibet and China. And they let us do that for about 30 minutes while they were calling their superiors. After about half an hour to 45 minutes, they put us in a van and took us away. They took us to this building nearby the Bird's Nest. I couldn't really read the name, but it was some kind of university research building or somea research facility is enough to make a man nervous. And Blumenfeld confesses to being a little scared. "But the fear was that they wouldn't tell us what was going to happen to us. We didn't know if we would be there for a week, ten days, or more."

Blumenfeld's fears were allayed by the fact that six groups of pro-Tibet protestors had already been arrested in Beijing, "and almost all of them were deported within a day. But there was a group that got grabbed the same day as us; they stayed for five

The university building the group was brought to, Blumenfeld says, "wasn't a cell, it wasn't a police building, it was just some building that wasn't being used at night. When we got there, we stayed together for a while, and they filmed us a lot more. Then

had one guy questioning me, and then three guys next to me, and one guy filming. Three of them were in blue police uniforms. I don't know if they were local police or federal police. The guy who was the head guy, he was wearing a polo shirt, and he was smoking. He didn't speak any English, but I felt like he was the authority in the room. One guy was asking me questions in English, very bad English. And he would handwrite everything that he would ask me."

One question was so simple that Blumenfeld didn't quite know how to answer it. "He asked, 'Where did you get this slogan, "Free Tibet"?' It was hard to understand what he meant by the question. other people did get that. The group that protested after us, they got some really bad treatment. They were tied to chairs, and they were interrogated for, like, ten hours at a time."

The Chinese officials seemed to assume that a bunch of activists in their 20s — Blumenfeld is 26 — couldn't be acting on its own initiative. "They asked who was our leader, who organized this, if we got paid to do this, did the government send us. They thought someone must have paid us or that we were just tools of the Dalai Lama or

something."

the bones all start becoming disconnected. Early this month, the federal government seized mortgage behemoths Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. They have \$1.6 trillion of debt outstanding, and derivatives called "credit default swaps" guarantee payment of that debt. Those debt-guaranteeing derivatives motivated the government to seize the entities. There could have been a chain reaction.

On a weekend in March, the Federal Reserve rushed to keep Wall Street's Bear Stearns from failing. It was

committed to \$13.4 trillion worth of derivatives. That's chump change compared with a quadrillion. But our leaders justified pouring \$29 billion into the rescue because, they said, the Dow Jones Industrial Average would plunge 2000 points if Bear went bankrupt. JPMorgan Chase took over Bear and now is a party to \$90 trillion of derivatives. What would happen if Morgan came asunder?

We may find out. Last weekend, two brokerages disappeared because of excessive derivatives exposure. (Two years ago, *thebanker.com* named Lehman "Bank of the



Here's the bottom line: Derivatives with names such as credit default swaps, collateralized debt obligations, and mortgage-backed securities are the villains in the problems of Bear Stearns, Lehman, AIG, Merrill Lynch, Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac, and other financial institutions that may disappear.

the \$1.14 quadrillion — is misleading. The gambles between two parties net out against each other. Actually, only 1 or 2 percent of the notional value may be on the line, claim the optimists. So? Are you comforted that \$10 trillion to \$20 trillion could be at risk when total U.S. annual economic output is \$14 trillion? Even if only a

small portion of that \$10 trillion to \$20 trillion is actually at risk, as some claim, it is an almost inconceivable amount of money.

"The risk of a [chain] reaction is significant," warns James Hamilton, economist at the University of California, San Diego. "The magnitude of these things is just staggering. I would have thought that the last year would have been a time of

winding them down, battening down the hatches. We need to unwind these derivatives - we need to deleverage [cut down excessive debt]." But it's not happening. "It's more than a can of worms. It is a world full of tangled worms."

Apologists argue that it's not that institutions like Bear Stearns are too big to fail, it's that they are too interconnected to fail. "But who is

going to bail out the Federal Reserve? Who is going to bail out the federal government?" asks Hamilton. "Everybody wants to put their head in the sand. The derivatives are so complex. Sometimes the institutions don't know what they've got."

Indeed, the essence of white-collar fraud is contrived complexity. Derivatives are concocted by Harvard and MIT math Ph.D.s so that

nobody can understand them. Hamilton says they should

be regulated. "If you are too big [or too interconnected] to fail, then you are too big not to be regulated," he says. Following the Bear Stearns calamity, there have been moves to inject some orderliness in the over-the-counter derivatives market. There has been discussion of regulation.

"The possible compounding chain reaction to the

failure of one or two major financial institutions is real and concerning," says Arthur Lipper III, a Wall Street veteran who now lives in Del Mar. "The possible problems are vastly greater than any single or group of regulating bodies has an ability to manage." Lipper suggests one route to reform: board members of institutions borrowing heavily to gamble on derivatives should not be indemnified against personal responsibility. Such a move "would have the immediate effect of financial institutions becoming more conservatively managed."

Ross Starr, economist at the University of California, San Diego, says that if one party can't make its obligation, "It causes the whole house of cards to come down. It's not that the instruments themselves pose a systemic risk but rather that they redistribute financial losses in an unpredictable way. If it causes illiquidity to the rest of the economy, we have a problem. It's something we haven't quite figured out." Amen. How can we figure out something we can't comprehend?

The derivatives are so complicated that any regulators will have a hard time understanding them: "There's not a lot of transparency there," says Starr. "Regulators will not be able to focus on that. It's a source of concern. We have not adequately come to terms with this."

More than ten years ago, University of San Diego professor of law Frank Partnoy wrote the first exposé of derivatives abuses, F.I.A.S.C.O.: Blood in the Water on Wall Street. At that time, derivatives were not big potatoes. He admits to being surprised that the notional value has climbed to a quadrillion dollars. In a recent article for the Financial Times of London, Partnoy says that today's derivatives crisis is similar to that of the 1990s, except it involves much more money. The crisis that forced Orange County into bankruptcy looks small by comparison with the mortgage write-downs of big financial institutions today.

He sees the end of this calamity on the horizon. "We will emerge from this crisis, and then another will hit in a few years," he says, greatly because of moral hazard: if we keep bailing out the gamblers, they will continue to

to reeducate Blumenfeld and his friends on the subject of Tibet. "After we did the interrogations, we just stayed in this room for, like, six hours trying to sleep. And then this one guy just kept talking to us. He was trying to befriend us, and he told us all these crazy things about the Dalai Lama. How he is a big murderer and how the Tibetans kill people — just a whole lot of crazy things. After a while we were on friendly terms and we weren't scared anymore, so we just told him, 'That is not true.' "

After a night spent intermittently sleeping and listening to Chinese propaganda regarding Tibet, Blumenfeld and associates were put in a van and driven to the airport, where they were flown to New York at the expense of the Chinese government. "They put us on an Air China flight. They walked us all the way to the gate. It was funny, as we were at the airport, there were almost always 10 to 20 police around us, but all in plain clothes. We ran into another group of people being deported at the airport. It was two British guys. We ended up walking to the same terminal, and we noticed that they had all these people circling them, and they said, 'Oh, yeah, we are getting deported too for scalping tickets." ■

#### **Bag Plague Delays**

In response to your excellent article on plastic bags ("Plague of the Urban Tumbleweeds," Cover Story, September 11), do not waste your time trying to get the City to ban the bags or initiate a recycling program.

From long and personal experience, the city council and our ostensibly strong mayor are not interested in doing anything except raise their own pensions. The delays which you've seen with bag banning, under the guise of needing more information or having to hear from all sides, is just emblematic of the stalling tactic that is the hallmark of city hall. They will delay most matters long enough until the public tires of waiting or dies.

A few examples: my wife

and I have been averaging about \$2 per month on the water we actually use but continue to pay about \$40 for all the fees and charges. There's no incentive to conserve. Add to that the heavy users who refused to pay their bills because they were too high. So the City negotiated a reduced charge, which, incidentally, was not offered to the homeowner. If there's no incentive to conserve water (or any other utility), there's no incentive to recycle.

How long has the seal debate been going on in La Jolla? Twenty new generations of seals have come and gone since this issue surfaced. Because there's nothing in it for the city council, there's no incentive to settle the issue either way. After years of debate, the State, the environmentalists, the ocean folks, the kiddies, the courts, and the City have all had enough time to make their points over and over again. Still, there's no agreement and no solution that could possibly satisfy any-

How long have we been discussing the Chargers? Will they go; will they stay? Who cares? By the time that debate is settled (again, either way), football may be replaced with tiddledywinks.

What about the De Anza Cove issue? That's been around since 1965. The State mandated that the mobile home park would revert to a public park when all the residents left, as they

had agreed to do under the terms of their lease with the De Anza Corporation (based in Beverly Hills, of all places). Some of the folks are still there, lurking behind fences on a public park!

And the audits? And the pension fiasco? Dare I mention SEDC and CCDC? Do vou truly believe these critical issues will ever be solved with justice and equanimity?

I know that the airport is not a City issue, but it is in our communal backyard and is still fomenting debates, decade after decade. Our City is certainly not in the decision business.

Getting rid of plastic and paper bags is a joke. And yet, there was a time before plastic bags when shoppers used their own bags and walked to nearby stores. Now that we've built our stores miles from our homes, we must drive and waste as much gas as it now takes to manufacture all those petroleum-based bags. To cite one notable exception: Costco uses cardboard boxes or, with your agreement, will place your purchases directly in the shopping carts.

Okay, here's another example: Singapore banned chewing gum, and the gum manufacturers of the world did not boycott. An enlightened government saw the problem and did something about it without spending years debating the obvious. (In contrast to this, the Pacific Beach Business Improvement District recently proposed another fee to pay for the removal of gum from the sidewalks. The fee would be unnecessary if P.B. became a gum-free zone.) So, if you're visiting Singapore, don't chew. If you're visiting P.B., watch your step.

Here's the solution: continue to stuff the recycle bins with plastic bags and let Edco or Allied recyclers deal with the problem of clogged machines. If they get mad enough, they could retaliate by storming city hall to demand a solution, including fixing their machines. They might even bring pressure to bear on the trash-collection folks to stop collecting the city council's trash. And then, miracle of miracles, if the city council's trash is not



#### STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP

We took the kids to the aquarium, and that got me to thinking about what eats what in the marine environment. Little fishes are pretty much lunch for bigger fish, but they also have ways of protecting themselves. They can either swim fast or hide in rocks or something else. But then I thought about jellyfish. They have no sharp fins, and they can't travel very fast. They have stingers, but they use them to catch their own prey. I would think they're pretty easy to catch. They don't look too tasty or nutritious, but is there something in the ocean that eats jellyfish?

— Curiosity got the best of me, at the beach

I don't know how tasty they are, but they can't be too nutritious. About 97 percent of the average jellyfish is water. They have no hearts or brains or much of anything else except tentacles, extendable mouths, stomachs, and reproductive organs. A real streamlined critter, even though some of them can get six, ten feet wide or more. Despite this unpromising plateful, quite a few sea-dwellers dine on jellyfish. Sea turtles are probably at the top of the list. They even migrate to find the most promising jellyfish areas. And certain kinds of the larger rockfish, sunfish, and crabs will nip away at jellies. Salmon and sea birds chomp up some of the mild-stinging varieties.

But jellyfish are pretty efficient cannibals. Comb jellies love a meal of comb jellies. They can engulf dinner in a single mouthful, even if the entrée is as big as the diner. (Stingless comb jellies are actually jellyfish cousins, as scientists see it.) But best of all, under certain circumstances, jellyfish will eat themselves. When food is scarce, a jelly can consume its gonads and other noncritical body parts and shrink itself so it won't require as much food.

So let's end with the most disgusting jelly predator: man. In Asia (principally China, Vietnam, and Japan) jellyfish are key ingredients in various stir-fries. And if you too would like to harvest your own jelly and invite friends over for an exotic treat, here's how you prepare them. Scoop up the jellies, remove everything but the umbrella and the fleshy mouthparts, dust them with salt and alum, and set them aside to dry 20 days or so with a heavy weight on them. This ensures that when they're ready, they'll be dry and crispy and crunchy, which is apparently the hallmark of USDA Grade A jellyfish. Chop the jellies into strips, and throw them into your favorite stir fry. If that's too much work, dried jellyfish are sold in Asian markets. And one of the newest vending machine snacks in Japan is a package of dried jellyfish and dipping sauce. So, Curiosity, jellies are hunted down by everything from sea turtles to mankind. A hectic life.

Hey, Matt:

While watching the show America's Deadliest Catch, the narrator kept referring to the rookie fishermen as "green horns." Now, I did not notice any budding horns on their seemingly smooth skulls, but I am still at a loss: Where does this name come from?

Anything new or young has been called "green" since the Middle Ages. Think plant sprouts; no matter what the color of the adult plant, the sprout is green. By the 15th Century a young cow just sprouting horns would be called a greenhorn. Now it's anybody who's new on the job, without the necessary skills. Better to be a greenhorn than a tinhorn, which is a cheap, low-class gambler. Comes from a low-stakes American gambling game in which the dice are shaken in a tin cone. The game attracted all the shady characters, who became tinhorns.

I Vaughn to Be Alone

I would like to dispute something that Matthew Alice said in his column of September 4... He says that "Vaugh" is Welsh for red. That's not right... I looked in a Welsh dictionary...under "red," nothing at all. I looked in all sorts of mutations. Welsh is a very strange language, and a word can begin with several different consonants. I looked in a Random House dictionary, and it says Vaughn is a boy's or girl's name. So I have...The Meaning of All Common Given Names, by Miriam Allen Ford.... I looked up "Vaughn," and it says, "Vaughan or Vaughn: Celtic, short in stature." So I look in my Welsh dictionary under "short." Nothing that resembles "Vaughn," but then let's try "small" or "little." Sure enough, under small and little, one of the words is "Man...." # A Word About Electrical Safety

pick up the phone and hear a grunt, ambient department-store music, bar noise, and slot machines. I know the grunt. "Larry, where are

"Harrah's. Laughlin."

"Wanted a drink."

Larry Gibbons and I worked the Alaska pipeline together, hitchhiked North America for several years, were witnesses to the major events in each other's lives. This is the man who once gave me the best tip about electrical safety I've ever heard. I haven't seen him in a couple years.

We took the retirement-first, work-later career option. My first full-time job came to me at the age of 45. Larry was an early bird, scored his first legitimate job at 42.

Before that we were college students, travelers, pipeline laborers, college students, and travelers. In those days we had the most important thing: all the time in the world. Finally, the must-get-a-job day arrived and I turned to writing for money. Larry turned to computers.

When you begin your professional career by giving your contemporaries a 20-year head start, you will quickly learn to walk an unorthodox path. Larry had two big things going for him: a 150 IQ and an obsessive personality, which, when translated into daily life, meant doing things such as getting a master's degree in Russian from the University of Washington in the shortest period of time on record. This is core Larry — unless you're doing something 12 hours a day, seven days a week, it's

Larry's imagination was captured by computers, and so he bought one and studied 12 hours a day, seven days a week. After an extraordinary series of events, he was hired by a computer firm in Irvine. Keeping in mind the unorthodox career path we traveled, the computer company was non-mainstream, a subsidiary of an Indonesian weapons manufacturer.

By now his skills are so technical that I don't understand what he actually does, but it's suit-andtie and computers. Through another series of extraordinary events, Mr. Gibbons was offered a promotion to boss a big software-development program. The position was in Indonesia. Fortunate for me, because this is where I got the good news about electrical safety.

Now, Mr. Gibbons, an honor student of languages, had been studying the local tongue before he arrived in Jakarta. I got a letter from him a couple weeks after he touched down:

The language is a mystery and a delight. I can speak far better than I can understand and that gets me into a lot of trouble. I craft phrases in my mind, then speak a few words and a torrent of Bahasa Indonesian is unleashed in return. In self-defense, I often tell them right off that I speak like a child and know but a few words, so go slow and simple. Sometimes, though, the magic happens and I can chatter along even without English echoes in my mind. It always falls apart later on. If I hear a sentence comprised only of words I understand, I can usually make it out, though 'words I understand' is a very relative thing. If there's just one new word, I can likely get the drift, but if there's two, three, or more new words, the whole thing collapses and all comprehension flees.

"The most complete communication failure I've experienced has been right here in the Jakarta Hilton, where I've been staying while looking for a house. I have an exquisite portable computer and an adapter that lets me plug it into the wall socket in the room. That works fine, but the power supply is quite dirty and generally suspect in Jakarta. In most places, people have heavy-duty power conditioners and surge protectors for each expensive electric device. I thought it would be easy to find out if the Hilton has its own power-conditioning system that guarantees clean power to the outlets in the rooms. I've tried to get this question across to a dozen hotel persons, in English, Indonesian, and sign language.

"Nothing has gotten across, and I've resorted to drawing smoothly undulating curves of a sine wave to represent the normal condition of good, clean electric power. The front-desk fellow is nodding along, agreeing and murmuring with reassurance, all is as it should be. Then I draw a spike straight up, make a sound like 'ffffffffftttttt, kerblamo,' and throw my arms into the air to indicate that as a result of this potential power spike, my computer could be fried. Immediate concern. The clerk says, 'Your computer is broken, how sad.'

"No, no, no, not broken. It just might break, though, if a power surge happens, like the one in the picture. I'm afraid an electric power surge could happen. Is it likely?'

'You don't have to be afraid of the electricity. You must not put your finger in the wall socket, but you don't have to be afraid of the electricity.'

With the electrical season coming on, it's a timely message for us all.

#### Mira Mesa upends Helix in last minute







The psychedelic stained-glass window over the altar (and even above the electric sanctuary lamp) caught the feel of Christ Church Unity pretty well: psychedelic, but still stained glass. Modern spirituality swirled with tradition. More

examples: heavy velveteen curtains hanging behind a marble altar bearing brass candlesticks and cross but surrounded by folksy, brightly colored posters celebrating NEW LIFE (Now Energize Willingness Laugh Intensity Fasting Embrace) posters that were in high contrast with the deeptoned oil paintings depicting the Holy Family that lined the side walls; a sizable choir in teal-and-white robes sang a complex arrangement of "Our Hope Alone Is You, O Lord," then gave way at service's end to a swinging ballad: "Everything I see/ Everything I do/ Everything I am/ is You"; the Lord's Prayer was recited, but tweaked the usual, "Lead us not into temptation" rendered "Leave us not in temptation" - God is not subjecting us to the trial; a prayer of thanks that opened with "Precious Father" concluded with "Thank you, Father-Mother God."



The stuffed animals, however, were *sui generis*. Three — a goat and two bunnies — sat up on the pulpit. But dozens, perhaps hundreds, more occupied the pews in the left alcove of the church. "We collect them, starting in July," one woman told me. "At Christmas, we'll be giving them to, I think, children in San Diego and Tijuana. You're welcome to hug one and give it some love." Another woman told me that by Christmas the Sanctuary would be, well, stuffed with them.

"God's good is yours" was the greeting we exchanged at the outset — a setup for the central idea of the sermon: "God is the source of my supply and provides amazing channels now." (The congregation spoke that line as well — twice. Pastor Blair Tabor recited it several times on top of that. "Because we're trained to look outside of ourselves, it takes a while to make the connection," he explained. "We need to hear it over and over and over. The teaching is that God is our source, that we're one with the living presence of God, and Jesus said that the Kingdom

of God is within you.")

The sermon began a series on Prosperity and had two interesting setups. First, a single-verse scripture reading from Exodus: "You shall have no other gods before Me." ("Gracious spirit, open our minds to understand that You alone are all we will ever need," prayed the reader.) Second, the announcement of the upcoming Keys to the Kingdom prosperity classes, led by Tabor. "The class will challenge you to live from a level of faith and commitment that truly is transformational," said the reader. "Reverend Blair has seen lives completely changed. Requirements include purchasing the book and a CD or tape set, and tithing ten percent of your income for the duration of the seven-week class."

Prior to the sermon, Tabor had led a prayer, underlaid with mournful tones from a choir-loft clarinet, which sought to "open us in a deeper way to that presence of God and that work of the Spirit within us" — work that would "animate our whole being with the vibrancy of that

Christ-presence of God. We come alive with that sense of moving as a part of the Spirit," with the Spirit "working through all circumstances to bring forth blessings."

Opening that channel to God the Source, said Tabor, was the great key to prosperity. He quoted a riff on that line from Exodus: "Thou shalt not look to another source but God for thy supply." He quoted Jesus: "Seek first the kingdom of God, and all these things will be added to you."

"God wants to bless us," concluded Tabor. "God has all kinds of ways to bless us.... If we start with that connection, that holiness of the presence, and see ourselves as part of that, then we have a good beginning." And quite possibly, a good ending: "God is the beginning point, but God is also the destination, and God is the process. In every movement, the presence

of God is there."

The choir backed him up. "God is the source of my supply/ Ready the good to multiply..."

In conclusion, Tabor prayed over a wooden box containing prayer requests. "Dear God, we know You are the source of blessing, and we seek that for each one for whom we pray...people affected by the storms of life — of all kinds. We know You are present as the source of good...thank you, God; thank you, God." And then the whole congregation left their pews and joined hands along the aisle and sang: "Let there be peace on earth/ and let it begin with me/ Let there be peace on earth/ the peace that was meant to be..."

What happens when we die?
"We go on to the next dance," said Tabor.

My nephew Tom needs to sweep his woman off her feet. It seems there was a lovers' quarrel and feelings were hurt. "What about sending her a sky message, you know, one of those banners towed behind an airplane?" I offered. The idea seemed to lift his spirits. So I headed off to gather the skinny.

"Banner Joe," of Aerial Advertising (619-222-4909; aerialadvertise.com), has been in this line of work since 1984. "Years ago, I had a product that I was trying to advertise, and it was going to cost me a lot of money," he explained. "I owned an airplane, so I thought, I can advertise it in the air. So I went around to various conventions towing my banner behind my

Aerial Advertising flies over San Diego, Las Vegas, Phoenix, and the Los Angeles area and offers banner-towing, skywriting, and skytyping. "Skytyping uses five airplanes, and they spit out what looks like a typewritten message. The price starts at \$5000 and goes up. Skywriting uses just one airplane and the price starts at \$700."

What is the substance?

"It is a very light oil that completely dissipates and is not harmful to the environment. It comes out of the exhaust, which is about four inches in diameter. When it comes out, it fattens up and is as wide as the airplane's wings, which are roughly 30 feet."

Where can you fly?

"We have to fly 12,500 feet over any large area like San Diego. And if we go inland, we can fly at maybe 6000 or 7000 feet. And we have to fly 2000 feet away from any building in the downtown area, such as Petco Park. For flying by the Q, we fly at about 500 feet or more out from the perimeter of the building; in other words, the parking-lot area. For the beaches we can fly lower; we fly at 500 feet altitude and 500 feet out from the breakers."

How do the logistics of skywriting work? "A pilot goes out generally 15 to 20 minutes beforehand and puts out trails to see how long it's going to last. If it doesn't last too long, then he goes up another 200 or 500 feet" and tries other test trails. "It all depends

on altitude and how much winds are coming in and the humidity of the day. If there are clouds in the sky, the writing, which is white, doesn't show up well. But weather like today, with a very small amount of cumulus cloud formations, would be a good day for skywriting."

"Our skywriting has been known to go to New Mexico. If the wind is ten miles an hour at 12,000 feet, then every hour it will travel ten

And what about visibility from the ground? "We know that you can see the message well 15 miles away from where it is done. So if you want to see the message all over the county, then it should be done three times: one in the south, one in the middle, and one in the North County."

How long can the plane be in the air? "We can fly as long as four hours. Soon we "We do a lot of proposals. I try real hard to talk them out of it."

will have another airplane that will be able to fly roughly eight hours." Joe says the rising cost of fuel, now up to \$6 a gallon, has affected business. "The planes use 15 to 17 gallons an hour,"

And what about the classic "Will U Marry Me?" in dots of smoke?

"We do a lot of proposals. I try real hard to talk them out of it," laughed Joe. "I could tell

We moved on to advertising via banners.

"With banners, you get more for your money. There is a broader range with a banner, such as smiley faces," and a range of colors and images.

And the reason you often see the banner-towing planes by the beach, "There are normally 650,000 people on any good weekend on our beaches. That is according to the chamber of commerce. So the beach is the biggest congested area. But football games, baseball games, [the Ocean Beach] chili cook-off, those all have a lot of people also."

How big of a banner can you tow?

"We tow from 50 to 100 feet. Some of our banners have been 110, 115 feet long. If the customer wants the ban-

ner over land, we have to fly 1000 feet high, so the letters on the banner should be seven feet high. If they want it for the beach, we fly it at 500 feet high and the letters can be as low as five feet tall."

Joe related one touching banner memory. "About 28 years ago, a 13-year-old Boy Scout got lost in the Cuyamacas, and

there had been a light snowfall. A lady called me and asked me to fly a banner up there saying, 'Tommy, hug a tree and stay where you are.' She figured he was wandering and that is why they couldn't track him down. Tommy saw the banner and stayed put and they found him."

Joe offered an example with the pricing. "This week we have a marriage proposal banner that will be flying five times in Long Beach. It will cost the client about \$470. Another client wants a 'Happy Birthday' banner to fly for about an hour and a half here in El Cajon. That will cost over \$400."

Air Ads (619-562-0055; airadsinc.net) also offers banner-towing. "A client calls up and tells us what they want us to fly," explained owner Jim Oakley. "They give us a copy, and we put together the message for them. It can be up to 50 characters long. Letters can be red or black. And the price is \$350 for one hour."

For the cost of a banner with graphics it "depends on how large it is, but you can figure \$2.50 a square foot, plus the additional cost of towing. Depending on how many hours you are going to fly, figure around \$300 an hour."

Anywhere you cannot fly?

"We can fly pretty much anywhere unless the president is in town. If he is in town, you cannot fly anywhere; they shut everyone down."

As soon as my eyes alighted upon the words "Poodle Fest," I knew I'd found the event I didn't know I'd been searching for.

Twenty minutes later, Rosa, Josue, David, and I piled into my car and set off for the Del Mar Horsepark. It was unanimous — poodles were silly looking, and any opportunity to see them up close was not to be missed. As I merged onto Interstate 5, Rosa said she'd always thought poodles were "snobby, wimpy, and stuck-up." She admitted those were more the char-

acteristics of the dogs' owners whom she'd encountered in the past, but she still deemed the "froufrou" pups guilty by association. Neither David nor I cared for the fancy Frenchwoman aesthetic of the typical poodle 'do, and Josue thought poodles were simply uncool for anyone who is not white, female, and really old.

It was 1 p.m. when I pulled onto a small dirt road and parked my Mini among the Mercedes and Lexus SUVs. "Okay, get it out now," I said to my crew of doggie oglers. Josue asked what the hell I was talking about. "I don't want these dogs to know — I mean, to think — that we're mocking them. So giggle now if you have to." Josue pointed out that I was the only one who seemed to be having difficulty maintaining my composure. He was right. I wiped the smirk off my face and led my posse toward the tents on the green.

We approached one tent, beneath which a man was busy styling the mane of a large white standard poodle on the table before him. The man had close-cropped brown hair and wore sunglasses, a black suit, and cornflower blue shirt. His maroon tie, dotted with black silhouettes of poodles, was the only outward indication that he wasn't an aspiring stockbroker who had wandered onto the wrong field.

The stoic pooch on the table stood still as its long white hair was teased into a bouffant. A thick coat of hair covered the animal's head and chest. Its back,

They were shaved as much as possible so that their thick coats didn't drag them down in the water, but fur was kept in crucial areas for insulation — on the chest, to protect the heart and lungs; on each side of the rump (the butt-balls), to warm the kidneys; and surrounding the joints. Hair was swept back and up from the face so as to leave the eyes unimpeded, and some hunters fastened it in place with brightly colored ribbons that made it easier to identify the dogs from a



# "L.A. was a bit disappointing," Matthias says.

**ERE IN SAN DIEGO,** the weather is excellent, the beaches some of the finest, and at least for the moment, the dollar is comparatively weak (though strengthening): All good reasons for foreign visitors to descend upon the city this summer.

To get an idea of just how many, the Department of Commerce and Office of Travel and Tourism Industries have a few numbers. In 2007, more than 645,000 international visitors passed through San Diego; the annual total — including both United States and non–United States residents — is around 32 million. Last year, 117,000 of the international visitors were from the United Kingdom, 49,000 from Germany, 88,300 from Japan, and 43,240 from Australia and New Zealand. The 2008 numbers have not yet been crunched.

According to D.K. Shifflet & Associates LTD, says the San Diego Convention and Visitors Bureau's San Diego County Travel and Tourism Forecast for 2008, San Diego is a topfive United States travel destination. Real Simple magazine's editor, Kris Connell, named it the best family-friendly destination last year, and Fodor's (of travel-guide fame) bills it on its website as having "an explod-

ing culinary scene and big-city nightlife, with a side of beach bum mixed in"

Matthias, who is 23 and traveling from London by way of Austria, has enjoyed San Diego more than many of the other destinations he has been during his trip, especially Los Angeles. He sips from a small cup of coffee at Java Jones, a café in the East Village a few blocks from the Lucky D's hostel where

he is staying.

Lucky D's, which, unlike Hostelling International, allows alcohol on its premises, looks not unlike a college dorm. Doors, painted off-white, are individually numbered; handmade magazine-collage art hangs on the wall, and patrons traipse the carpeted hallways in board shorts and flipflops, chattering with one another.

At Java Jones, things are a bit quieter.

"I think [San Diego has] got a lot of

charm," he says. "San Francisco's also nice, but I don't know, for some reason I just like San Diego better. Las more beautiful, in my opinion. I love the sea, so this is a city by the sea; that's also very appealing to me. I really

Vegas was just a very different place. It's all about gambling and money and girls and everything. Here, it's like San Diego."





cheery cherry red, and indoors, round tables sit adjacent to an airy, open kitchen where guests can cook and store their food. The dorm-style and private rooms, which range in price from \$17 to \$69, are brightly colored and full of light, with beds dressed in patterned sheets.

Despite the less than desirable condition of the Los Angeles hostel, Jennifer, who relates her story sunburned and smiling, reports that she had an excellent time.

"It was a dive of a place, but we had so

much fun," she says, laughing. "Because it was so small and everyone was so shocked by the dirtiness that we all kind of...We all went out on the back patio, and we got on really well, so we made a few friends up there. We met two girls from Dublin who were working there, and they decided to quit their jobs and come traveling with us."

All in all, she finds San Diego more relaxed than Los Angeles.

"I don't think people are as pretentious as they were up in L.A.," she says. "I'm not so happy that all the bars and clubs close at two. Like, literally, two o'clock, you're gone. They take your drinks off you, and you're pushed out the door. It's the same around here. I was in New York two summers ago, on Long Island, and you'd go out and it was great. At home the clubs close at half two or three."

She pauses.

"After New York [I went] to Miami, and things only really started getting going at four," she says. "And then, [I got the] shock of my life because I thought, *L.A.*, it

would be crazier over here and people would be going out the whole time, but it so wasn't what I expected."

Matthias had some high hopes for Los Angeles as well.

"I was so looking forward to L.A., and it was a bit disappointing," he says. "The city center does not have a lot of charm. For example, if you go to London, it's there. I think it's got a strong flavor to it. In L.A. I didn't get it. It's so spread out. That's what makes it very difficult."

Matthias reached Los

Angeles from the Grand Canyon via Greyhound bus. He has traveled throughout America exclusively via Greyhound and explains that his trip — which includes many national parks — is costing "hundreds and hundreds of dollars."

For many travelers, buses — Greyhound specifically — have been the choice of transportation for reaching destinations within America, at least for those visiting the West Coast. Some find it cheaper, others easier, and for more than a few, it becomes the source of

complete with couches and armchairs, a haven for laptop users catching up on email during their stay. Beds range from \$19 to \$82, depending on the room.

"On the way to Las Vegas I met this quote-unquote 'millionaire,' but it was all a bit dubious because she's on the Greyhound," Peter continues, brushing a lock of sandy hair from his face. "I [also] met some guy who'd been touring Iraq and had come home. [It was] kind of interesting to get his perspective."

Peter, who is 20 and clad in a Franz Ferdinand band T-shirt, hails from Somerset, England, and is part of an exchange program between Cambridge University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston, where he is spending a year studying chemical engineering. He and a friend he met at the college drove halfway across the country together, parting in Dallas, Texas; since then, Peter has been busing solo. He and his friend are set to meet in Los Angeles.

Ian, Gillian, Sinead, Elaine, Jen, and Scarlett, all from Dublin, Ireland, are also traveling by Greyhound as a group.

"Each one of us knows at least one of the others," Ian, 21, explains.

They sit at one of the patio picnic tables out back at the OB International Hostel, a hubbub of activity in the early evening. Christmas lights twinkle along the upper perimeter of the room, and the smell of marinara sauce is in the air. Those in the group who are of age drink Wyder's ciders, the others making do with soft drinks, and wait for a dinner of pasta and salad to be ready.

"The Greyhound bus from L.A. to here was crazy," says Gillian, who is 20. "The bus was all right, but the people were crazy. We met a prisoner, an ex-con."

"And a very angry

father and daughter," Ian adds.

"And a man in a hospital mask," chimes in Scarlett, who is 21.

The prices for a Greyhound ride vary. From Los Angeles to San Diego it averages out to about \$35 a person one way, according to the Greyhound ticket booking website; from Las Vegas to San Diego it's just under \$60. From San Francisco, another popular destination, it's just under \$74. Nonrefundable tickets are slightly less and with discounts can be even more inexpensive.

Matthias, at Java Jones, breaks it down.

"Well, from San
Francisco to Yosemite was
60-something dollars," he
says. "And the shuttles in
between are also expensive because the Greyhound never goes to the
[exact] location. So then I

had to take the shuttle."







they are going to the zoo and the beach. They are staying at the 500 West Hotel for \$100 a night.

The two of them, like Katherine from Germany, are doing an around-theworld trip. Craig, a plumber, sold his house to finance the trip. So far, they have been to India, Thailand, Malaysia, Australia, New Zealand, and

For their trip to San Diego, Katherine and Craig used a Rough Guide travel book, which, Katherine laments, was not particularly useful.

"It doesn't tell you a

lot about San Diego, but it just tells you the nickname is San D'Ego because everybody's got a chip on their shoulder [and] thinks a lot of themselves," she says, waiting in line at the International Visitor Information Center. "But we haven't really seen that."

Others have used guidebooks as well. Matthias prefers a series published by Lonely Planet, and the Dublin crowd uses one they cannot remember the name of, while others prefer to search on websites like

Google and the official page of the San Diego Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Some, like Joe, who is an Englishman traveling from Austria, scoff at many of the travel publications available. Lonely Planet (which is owned by the British Broadcasting Corporation) in particular, which has a website complete with travel blogs and feature articles, is quite popular among travelers, but this does not sway him. "I make a point of not reading Lonely Planet," Joe says. "[It] is just a load of rubbish. Lonely Planet is the anesthetization of travel. They have useless maps that are immediately out of date. Who needs a book that lists the price of a meal? It changes every year. It's a load of guff, carrying around a [book of] prices for restaurants."

Joe, who teaches math in Austria and describes himself as being "twenty-plenty," came to San Diego on a recommendation from a few friends he made in Madrid who happened to go to San Diego State University.

"I thought it was the sort of place you could find big fish that jump out of the water and play with dolphins or something," he says, tongue-incheek, of San Diego. "Erotic swims with orcas

and stuff like that."

He flew with Zoom Airlines, which has been making nonstop trips to San Diego from London as of June of this year (the first flight was on the 20th). He paid, he claims, "too much" and would have flown into Los Angeles if not for the direct flight.

"[The airline] is okay," he says, "but it's a pretty crap aircraft. It's all in Spanish, 'salida' this, etc., so I think they must have bought it from Liberia."

At the moment, Zoom flies both Boeing 757s and 767s; the average age of each aircraft, according to airfleets.com, is just shy of 15 years. A one-way ticket — at economy price, booking a month in advance costs anywhere from 23

to 218 pounds (\$46 to \$436.50, according to Yahoo! Finance's currency converter), depending on the time of departure.

Current airfares, many say, are much cheaper than they would be if the American dollar were not currently so weak.

The group traveling from Dublin paid 750 euros (which, at the time of this writing, is equal to \$1193) for a round-trip ticket on British Airways.

Bapsi flew from Vienna to Chicago with Austrian Air, and from Chicago to San Diego with American Airlines, and says she paid around \$1200 for both flights, which is roughly 1900

Jennifer took Continental Airlines from Shannon, Ireland, to Los Angeles for 970 euros -\$1537, round-trip.

Other things are less expensive for travelers here than they are in their home countries as well; perhaps most notable is the cost of gas.

"[Gas is] about a pound a liter [in England], which is about \$7 or \$8 a gallon," Peter says. "But it's been [raised] about 95 pence or a pound, whereas here it's doubled or something. I don't really know too



much about it, but it's significantly cheaper for me here than in England."

He's not far off; gas, at the time of this writing, averages \$7.56 a gallon in the U.K., whereas here it's only \$3.78, according to the United States Energy Information Administration website.

It's not just gas; clothing, for instance, which several travelers noted, costs far less.

"When we went shopping, we couldn't get over how cheap all the clothes are," says Jennifer, who confesses she is buying a lot of dresses and shoes here in America. "It's just the fact that our euro is so strong. And the drink is so cheap here. Not when you go out in the clubs, that's kind of expensive, [depending] on what bars you go to, but when you're [having] a few drinks at home

before you go out, it's very cheap."

Others agree.

"It's so much cheaper here," Gillian exclaims.

"And it's easier to spend your money," Ian adds, laughing.

Brand names tend to be less money in America than in many travelers' home countries. Natalia points out that many American products retail for far less and names a few brands that are of particular interest to her.

"If you see Nike, which is really popular in Brazil, it's much, much cheaper here," she says. "And of course iPods, Apple stuff, [is] much cheaper."

Brazilians, according to Reuters, have paid the most for iPods in the past; in 2007, a four-gigabyte Nano ran around \$370, while, at that time, they went for \$150 in the United States.

Comparative

expenses aside, all the visitors report enjoying San Diego, no matter what stage of their trip they are in.

"[People are] more open and tolerant; they are just more outgoing," says Katherine from Germany. "I think people are more allowed to be crazy. Like, they can do their own thing, they can just walk around like whatever they want to be. Not like back home. Everybody's looking at you if you have a crazy hat or...I don't know how to explain. I think it is like that. Maybe it's because I grew up in a small town."

Ian agrees.

"In Ireland, you have general people, but over here, you don't know what it's going to be," he says. "You can be crazy over here if you want."

Victoria, 26, finds San Diegans to be among the more sincere Ameri-

can people she's met in her considerable travels. From Edinburgh, Scotland, she has explored the American East Coast and is currently in the middle of a year of travel. "A lot of the people in the places I've been to, they've got a kind of fake sincerity, like 'Hi, how are you?' and you go to answer and they're already over there and they can't give a toss," she says. "Here, people are actually interested in what you have to say and what you're saying."

Victoria considers
San Diego a place where
she could eventually settle
down. "You find that
there are a lot of places
[that] you get a feeling
about," she says. "A sense
of them, like whether you
could live there or not....
I think I could live here
quite happily."

Matthias, too, is having a good time. His only disappointment, he says, has been with the number of transients he has seen, though he says San Diego has fewer than other places he has been.

"San Francisco was terrible," he says. "And I'm just not used to being asked for money all the time, [and] I feel bad refusing it. In Europe, this doesn't happen. There will be a homeless person in the street with a hat there, but they will rarely ever bother you. They will have a sign there, 'Please help,' but they won't come up to you and ask you, where here sometimes you're in a restaurant, they will come into the restaurant and ask you, 'Sir, can you buy me something to eat?' or 'Can I have some money?' Here they bother you."

But he genuinely likes San Diego and does not mind at all staying for the month he will be here in this country in what he described earlier as "a city by the sea."

Xinyi, who is 18 and traveling from China with her mother, likes the proximity of the ocean as well.

"It's great, it's really great. I love the city by the sea," she says.

So far, she and her mother have attended a Beatles tribute concert, seen Seaport Village, and visited the Children's

lly

Museum.

Xinyi, like Victoria, has also had good luck meeting locals — they recommended she eat at the Tin Fish restaurant, which she and her mother plan on doing —

and she has a favorable view of Americans in general.

"In America people are quite friendly," she says, having stopped in at the visitors' center. "Like just now, we got the map at the station, people come and ask us, 'Do you need help? Where do you want to go?' In China, people won't just do that. It's not that people in China aren't friendly, but they will not come and

help unless you ask them. They would think it was weird to go up and [offer] help."

She pauses.

"It's sweet here," she says. ■





phones and started folding. died today. Fifty-four years old. Cancer."

Well, at that point I was sucked in. Of course, his life story followed. I listened intently as he ran down the six different addresses on Brighton Avenue he had lived at for a number of years before being drafted and sent to Vietnam. We chatted briefly about his time in the jungle but never actually got into the "meat." We discussed how my father was a firefighter in the Air Force Reserves, and he talked about all the times them "flyboys" saved his life. I surely didn't feel like bursting this guy's bubble, so I didn't tell him that my dad was not a "flyboy" during Vietnam.

The conversation revolved primarily around his extended family and not around his own life. His sister-in-law had left behind twin boys who were now in their 30s, one with a couple of children himself.

"Amazing kids, really great people." Pausing for a second, he continued, "I guess the whole marriage thing was never for me, so I'm happy they're out there carrying on my name. I was never able to keep a lady in my life. Kept offing those girls." At which point he pointed gun-shaped fingers at his head and squeezed the "trigger."

Did this man, in a state of emotional confusion, just admit that he had committed murder? Even more, did he admit that it was on several occasions?

Apparently I misinterpreted his intention. What he meant to infer was that somehow he had always messed up good relationships with stupidity, and it had led him to where he was today. But the thought of standing next to a serial killer was one part scary and two parts thrilling.

Either way, what came next changed the entire course of our tête-à-tête.

"You remember Chris Farley? That old skit about the guy who was livin' in a van down by the river? Well, that's me. I'm living in a van down by the beach."

There are plenty of people who have chosen to live

unconventionally, particularly in the beach communities. I am a firm believer in the rights of an individual to do so. As a case-manager working with families who have lost their homes in the wildfires, I have found that people seem to be comfortable with living in an RV so that in the event of a disaster they can just up and move everything they own. My initial assessment of this man was that for someone who had probably seen some really horrible things, he was doing all right. This could be why when he told me, bluntly, "I love my country, but I don't trust it," I responded with a surprisingly upbeat, "Could be a lot worse off than living by the beach in San Diego.'

He nodded, and we both went back to folding clothes. I could not determine if I had just offended him or if he had nodded in agreement. The elevator music that had been all up in my ear for the past 20 minutes seemed to fade. He broke the silence with a simple but important question: "So how

did you — being from New York and all — find O.B.?"

At first I wondered whether or not I should just ignore him. I'm always being asked that question, and most of the time the inquisitor is not even looking for an answer. The question just seems to serve as a reminder that I am not native and that I should feel uncomfortable in a new place — a visitor. Why did I place so much emphasis on the situation but couldn't care less about the actual conversation? I didn't even get the dude's name!

It didn't hit me right away, but on August 21, 2008, I reached Nirvana at the Wonderland Coin Laundromat on Abbott Street in Ocean Beach.

I'm here in San Diego because I want to be here. Of course I would love to have the ability to travel around the world and see it all without worrying about rent or car payments or the cost of soy milk. I have, nonetheless, through a series of avenues, chosen to get to where I am today.

What is most interesting is that although we differ in just about every imaginable manner, my situation is eerily similar to a man who has made the decision to live in a van down by the ocean. I cannot speak for all the bumps and bruises along the way, and I cannot tell whether or not he truly wants to be living this way. But is the question even worth asking? He and I are here, together, folding laundry, living the dream. His name, his goals, and the canker sore

he just can't get rid of none of these things matter because we're the same, he and I.

Guy from the Wonderland Coin Laundry, I'm looking for you. I want to thank you for putting everything in perspective. I want to apologize for thinking you are a murderer and that I was possibly victim number who-knows-what. Most of all, I want to get the whole story. I think you deserve to know mine as well, because I definitely held back during our time together. I would like to discuss in detail how you got to where you are today (and maybe get a little bit more information about all those girls you "offed").

Taking a mundane event such as doing laundry and turning it into a revelation is a selling point for fad diets, fundamentalist Christianity, and crack addiction alike. At a time when gasoline costs more than beer (finally,


hedge for a drive-through.







ever remains untouched. Every year or two, three or four nameless and always changing men in white shirts and ties (one always carrying the obligatory clipboard) would tour the grounds. Within two months, we would receive a slick fourpage newsletter from the new corporate owners stating that they were implementing changes that would make our "living experience" even more enjoyable. In English, that meant they would fire a gardener or two, move the manager off-site, and raise the rent as much and as quickly as possible.

To keep the overpriced apartments filled, they started allowing more and more people who were less and less family-oriented into the two-bedroom units and started allowing pets. The lawns became more litter boxes than playgrounds. By the time my daughter reached middle school, almost all her friends had moved or returned to their native countries. It was time to move.

We now rent a house a couple of blocks away with a distant ocean view of Catalina and San Clemente Island. The neighbors are pleasant and seemingly harmless. But back in Carlsbad, when there was a breakin or someone drove through our hedge and fence, the same neighbor who had pointed his H&K at me wouldn't hesitate to grab a shotgun and run out after the offender. Here, they all seem more likely to dial 911 from the safety of their bedrooms. I guess life's a tradeoff, just like neighborhoods. ■

"Everybody in the hotel read *The Little Dog Laughed*, everybody; a story to make you die holding the page and it wasn't about a dog, either; a clever story, screaming poetry...Mrs. Hargraves read it and I was a different man in her eyes thereafter. I got to stay on in that hotel, not shoved out in the cold, only often it was in the heat, on account of *The Little Dog Laughed*. Mrs. Grainger in 345, a Christian Scientist (wonderful hips, but kinda old) from Battle Creek, Michigan, sitting in the lobby waiting to die, and *The Little Dog Laughed* brought her back to earth, and that look in her eyes made me know it was right and I was right, but I was hoping she would ask about my finances, how I was getting along, and then I thought why not ask her to lend you a five spot, but I didn't and I walked away snapping my fingers in disgust.

"The hotel was called the Alta Loma..."

— excerpt from Ask the Dust, by John Fante

The above was written in 1939 by Fante, a major influence on cult poet and novelist Charles Bukowski. Several times I have been compared, by casual acquaintances, to Bukowski, and I think they mean well, but I do not necessarily consider this a compliment. I read *Ask the Dust* 

in a hotel room here in San Diego not unlike the one he describes in Los Angeles, only mine was in the Friendship Hotel on Eighth Avenue in Hillcrest, a historical Landmark and over 100 years old. I was on the second floor at first, overlooking Eighth, then later moved to a room downstairs ironically called "Escape from L.A." with no room number. I had moved in March to be near Mercy Hospital after surgery for a broken ankle. The only room available was up a flight of stairs, but soon I was given ELA, with air-conditioning and a back porch overlooking a garden and shaded by bird of paradise.

Unlike Fante's character, no one had likely read anything of mine and there was no Mrs. Grainger. Still, I thought, this was a fine place for a writer, in the tradition of Nathanael West (though he was a night clerk, not a guest, at a place not unlike the Friendship but in L.A.), Cornell Woolrich (who wrote Rear Window, etc., from a hotel room he shared with his mother in New York), the fictional Barton Fink, and, I suppose, Bukowski. French mystery novelist Simenon would write his slim detective novels only in hotel rooms, usually rented over a weekend, at various locations in Europe. But out on my deck, seated in the vinyl easy chair — atop a rendering of a zaftig, white-haired, middle-aged woman I have named "Zondra," painted by a regional artist — and in the shade of tropical plants, I might think of Hemingway in

Key West or Conrad on some exotic colonial island.

The Friendship is distinguished for several items, one being its mural on the west wing (two buildings, across the street from each other, make up the hotel) of a woman's profile stretching from ground

level to the roof. It is in the Art Nouveau style popular many decades ago, one that enjoyed resurgence in the 1960s. It is a style I have always been fond of and probably betrays a cornball romanticism and artiness I won't always admit to, but here is a fine example.

When one walks up the short flight





of steps to the front desk (no lobby) and turns immediately to the left, an old black-and-white photo is displayed. It is a photocopy of a photo, in fact, and the original may have been faded, but it is clearly the building across the street from 3942, the western side. The caption reads:



munity, engagement, meaningfulness, stillness...not necessarily achievement, status, and constant activity." The piece went on at some length, a socioeconomic essay that included some ecology, psychology, and other issues, but it kept coming back or at least I did — to the phrase "figuring out what is enough." The question was, and is: enough of what? The Friendship Hotel falls short of my living needs in only one area — well, after elbow room for guests, spotty Wi-Fi access, and the inadvisability of playing amplified guitar — and that is enough space for my books.

It has been an extremely convenient location. Within a few short blocks are Chipotle Mexican restaurant no lard, and if not cheap, neither is it unreasonable — Whole Foods, Ralphs, Kinko's (very handy for me), and several main bus routes that can be accessed a half-block away. If this reads like a recommendation in a travel guide, something like "San Diego on \$60 a Day," if that's possible, so be it. If nothing else, it may serve to counterbalance an Internet site about the Friendship titled "Horror on Eighth Ave," in which someone bemoans the lack of luxuries. Parking in the hotel lot is one (approximately \$40 per week, but neighbors I'd spoken with had no complaints about finding spots within one or two hundred feet; laundry facilities were less than ten feet from my door).

During the summer of 2008, another man I knew moved into the hotel from New York. Rick Ortiz, a 56year-old ex-amateur/Silver Gloves boxer, radio personality in Chicago, professional cook (his Puerto Rican cooking would indicate chef), and substance-abuse counselor (at Donovan State Prison, for one), checked in to write his book, tentatively titled Heroin Chronicles, about the effects of the Harrison Act in 1914. Part novel-like memoir and part persuasive document indicting the failed war on drugs, he chose this place to work. Although we had known each other elsewhere, it was, coincidentally enough, or preciously if you like, the Friendship Hotel where we became friends.

I paid \$253.13 every week for my air-conditioned room with sundeck, bath-

room, atmosphere, and whatever ghosts might have forgotten to check out. I think that's the high end there. The Friendship is not to be confused with the Marriott or even Motel 6.

The Friendship has been officially declared "Historic,

a 'Landmark' in San Diego," Tim Winterstein, an employee and maintenance worker at the Friendship, told me. The neighbors apparently were unamused by this, the idea being that less than celebrity/wealthy musicians, writers, and artists were undesirable in their backyards, to say nothing of the fixed-income folk and/or disabled, often less-thanglamorous guests of the hotel. I include myself here, though my income is maddeningly unfixed.

Hillcrest neighbors may

take comfort in the Friendship's policy of insisting that guests check out every 28 days for 24 hours. This may be inconvenient for some, but the idea is that the hotel is not a residential hotel, technically, and this policy goes some distance

in preventing court disputes with those claiming longterm tenancy.

As for a detailed history of this landmark, that may have to wait for a book, and it would likely be one worth reading.

"Wine invites conversation about its history, flavors, and nuances," says Silva. "You're not going to hear much conversation about hard liquor." Silva continues, "Guests love to learn. Make them feel special by giving some thought to what you are serving. Get online and ask your local wine store about your wines so you can educate your guests about what they are drinking.

But don't overdo it, he warns. "The key to entertaining with wine is simplicity. You don't want to intimidate people." Instead of providing an array of wine-specific glasses, Silva says, "Use simple glasses that you're comfortable with, particularly when you're inviting people who might not be diehard oenophiles.

Silva says the palate is like a sponge. "Like learning a foreign language, the more time you spend with people who are conversant, or even trying to be conversant, the more comfortable you will feel. At the end of the day, it is just a beverage.'

> Creed's second party idea, 'Roll Out the Red Carpet," is intended to make guests feel like a Hollywood star. This kind of theme works best when the purpose of the gathering is to watch an awards show or movie.

"Movie-poster-themed invitations [can] set the tone for this event," says Creed. On the big day, hosts might want to roll a red-carpet runner up the driveway. "Arm the neighborhood kids with [disposable] flash cameras to call out [guests'] names and snap their photo as they arrive." A rented



candy counter and popcorn machine can be set up at one side of the room. "When guests leave," Creed adds, "offer everyone their own swag bag filled with fun items.

"I've had popcorn with chardonnay," says Silva. "It goes well, particularly if it's buttered popcorn." Chardonnay-tasting notes often include the word "buttery." When asked what might pair well with candy, Silva responds, "Merlot, because you get plums, cherries, spice, and pepper. Chocolate and zinfandel go beautifully together." Most red wines go well with nuts and spicy snacks.

When purchasing wine for a party, one should figure on half a bottle per person. "Like food, it's better to err on the side of too much," says Silva. Wine should be kept cool. Silva recommends, "The mid-40s [degrees Fahrenheit] for white wine, low-60-degree range for red wine — heat is not a friend of red wine.'

Creed's third party theme is a "grownup slumber party" she calls "Girls' Night In," for which the hostess would convert her home into a spa. "The party begins with massages in the sun followed by post-massage sparkling wine and chocolates," says Creed, adding that once the sun goes down, guests

can "work off all the indulgences as [they] learn to pole dance from a professional.

Creativity, says Creed, is the most important ingredient of a successful event, and the first thing to create is a relaxed, friendly atmosphere. Creed insists the experience need not end when the guests leave.

The best hostess gift is one that is remembered long after the party is over," she says, "Your favorite scented candle, a favorite book, fun personalized stationery, or a great CD." She also recommends gifting a bottle of wine. "Write your name on the label — when they go to drink the bottle, they can make a



he six-mile-long Big Laguna Trail, high in the Laguna Mountains, wends its scenic way over gently rolling hills and grassy dales, never dipping below 5400 feet of elevation nor rising to more than 5900 feet. By combining the Big Laguna Trail (BLT) with a four-mile segment of the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT) as mapped here, you'll complete a loop hike of ten miles with lots of varied scenery.

Mountain bikers can use the Big Laguna Trail portion of the route described here, but bikes are prohibited on all parts of the PCT (the PCT is reserved for hikers, horses, and dogs). On a bike, however, you could close and shorten the loop



#### **OUTDOORS**

Fall Officially Begins at 8:44 a.m. Pacific Daylight Time on Monday, September 22 — a good excuse to throw a "thank-God-it's-Monday-morning" party to celebrate the occasion and kick off the work week. At equinox, the sun shines directly down somewhere on Earth's equator. At 8:44 a.m. San Diego time this year that equatorial spot lies deep in the Amazon basin. The autumn season will continue for another three months until the sun "moves" to its farthest southerly point, winter solstice, December 21.

**Equal Days and Nights** everywhere on earth, 12 hours each, are only one noticeable consequence during the time of equinox, either autumnal or vernal (spring). Another consequence is that the sun

at equinox always rises from a point on the horizon due east and later sets due west. You could calibrate a compass this way if you had access to a true (unobstructed) horizon. Another, subtle consequence is that at mid-latitudes like ours, morning and evening twilight periods are shortest during equinox. From San Diego, the duration of twilight this week is about 80 minutes; last June it was about 100 minutes


**Highest Tides for September** (a not-very-high +5.7 feet), are predicted for 7:17 p.m. on Thursday, the 25th and for 8:04 p.m. on Friday, the 26th. The month's two lowest tides (a not-very-low -0.3 feet) will occur on the mornings of the 25th and 26th at 1:19 a.m. and 1:56 a.m., respectively. During September the tidal range is typically minimized. Starting in mid-October, extreme negative tides will begin to occur during the afternoon hours (a much more convenient time for exploring tidepools in the low-lying intertidal zone), and not much in the early morning. By December the highest high tides will crest at about +7 feet and the lowest low tides will







#### **Different Arena**

Although the Sports Arena sits on city property, it has been operated by developer Ron Hahn and his son Ernie for over 15 years. The recent announcement that the Hahns were yielding majority control of the Sports Arena to AEG Live led George Varga of the Union-Tribune to crow last week that the move should bring a "swift increase in the number of live concerts" to the venue.

AEG, in effect, assumed the Sports Arena lease, which runs until 2017. But AEG already had a near-exclusive relationship with the Hahns, which allowed the promoter "first refusal" rights to book concerts at the Sports Arena.

"Why would you pay for the cow when you get the milk for free?" asks an insider who says that the AEG lease takeover was not necessary for the company to bring more concerts to the Sports Arena.

Other well-connected sources say that AEG - an international promoter of sporting events and concerts that operates over 30 concert venues worldwide — has other plans, including demolishing the Sports Arena and replacing it with residential and commercial development.

An ad hoc committee formed about four years ago by former councilman Michael Zucchet once claimed that the Sports Arena property would be better utilized for residential and commercial purposes.

"Those questions [about replacing the Sports Arena with condos] predate us,

Unlike the Chargers, who hold their hand out for public money, AEG will come in and take a neglected piece of property and with private money build a Staples Center [in L.A.], for example.

The 14,000-capacity Sports Arena most closely competes with Cricket amphitheater (19,000 capacity) and SDSU's Cox Arena (13,000). Both are run by Live Nation, which is the largest U.S. concert company; AEG is number two.

In 2001, Ernie Hahn said

#### **The Occasional Bomb**

"I was brought to San Diego via the hand of the judicial system," says Chris Powers, aka 3ntra-P, one half of the hip-hop duo Clay Pigeons. Born and raised in San Luis Obispo, he says, "When I was in seventh grade, a kid moved to town who wrote [graffiti]

for T.i.t.s. Krew, one of the largest graffiti krews in California....

"I learned the ABCs, literally, about the graffiti game from him. I started getting in trouble in and outside of school. I was suspended on a few occasions for fighting, suspicion of vandalism, [and] I did time in juvenile hall for being truant and got arrested for fights and shoplifting."

Powers says he was expelled from S.L.O. High. "[It was] for a fight, [for] which my parents had to pay over ten thousand dollars' restitution to the victim's family. My parents decided I was too much and declared me a ward of the state, and I was placed in foster care until I turned 18....

"Music kind of got me through a lot of the shit I was dealing with. It was an outlet for me when I was in jail. I moved to San Diego as soon as I was free from any legal obligations in San Luis Obispo. I had pretty much quit graffiti altogether, at least on walls. I kept it to paper and canvas but would still go out and bomb on occasion. I inevitably picked up an assault charge with personal use of a deadly weapon, not more than a year after landing in S.D."

Powers received a fiveyear sentence.

"With time served," he says, "I spent about 11 months away and have been dealing with probation for the past five years."

Clay Pigeons formed after he met Jimmy Powers (no relation) in early 2007. So far this year, the MC duo has performed around three dozen gigs. Their next show is September 29 at Brick by Brick.

complaining about the noise...but there's nothing on either side of [the Yard]. It's next to the freeway, and St. Vincent de Paul

across the street said we could play until midnight. "What usually

happens is 2 cops will come around ten and tell us to turn it down. Then, a couple hours later, 20 cops will show up.... We weren't having any problem until the cops found out what we were doing." He says police have issued three tickets so far. "They're all a thousand dollars each, and three different guys in the house got tickets. Now, we shut down shows earlier."

Around 50 bands have performed on the homemade plywood stage.

"We spent, like, 120 bucks on wood at Home Depot and built a stage on the dirt.... They were ripping the carpet out at the Horton Grand Theatre downtown, and they let us take it to put down over the dust in the yard." Acts that have played there include the Sess, DJ Holmes, and Witherell's bands, Steep Hill Project and Gasoline Chicken. As far as average

crowd size goes, Witherell estimates, "I wanna say under 50, for legal reasons.'

"It's about the 'Second Coming' of Elvis," says guitarist Chris Kelly. "It stars Jay Mohr, Joe Mantegna, and Nikki Cox — a superior helping of B-list stars if ever I've seen one."

According to Kelly,

"There are two direct routes into the movie music biz: one, you get real lucky or, two, you know someone. In

my case, my cousin Patrick Newall was one of the producers of the movie. There was another actual music supervisor, and several other producers had to okay the song too, so I don't want to sell it too short and say it was all in the connections. But it kind of was....

"Payment for things like this really varies," says Kelly. "You can get some money up front; how much depends on your stature. Then, you get standard royalty rates each time it's played somewhere in the movies or on TV....

"I've had some songs in smaller indie movies. I got a check for about 80 bucks a year for a couple years for each of them. When you get the check, it's pretty cool; it shows where the movie was played. I'm really quite well known now in Burma and Indonesia. [Lonely Street] has some bigger stars and should have a larger release. I stand to make, literally, hundreds



of dollars." Kelly attended a preview of Lonely Street in L.A., held in late August. He says he

The Wedding Present is an old, seasoned British band that you are not likely to have heard of unless you are a devotee of college radio or frequent the sorts of clubs that book indie-rock acts. With the exception of **David Gedge**, who lives in Los Angeles now, the Wedding Present's lineup has changed many times over the past 20 years, as has the band's name. First, they were the Lost Pandas. Gedge subsequently changed the band's name to the Wedding Present until 1998, when the Present went on hiatus and Gedge formed Cinerama. In 2004 he simply renamed the Cinerama  $\label{lineup} \textbf{(Chris McConville, Terry de Castro,}$ and Graeme Ramsay) as the Wedding Present. The release of *El Rey* earlier this year constitutes their eighth studio album since 1987. Not prolific output, unless you consider that, in the early '90s, the Wedding Present put out 12 singles in one year, many of which were released on vinyl during a time when mp3 downloads were becoming all the rage.

Releasing all of those consecutive singles was enough of a publicity feat to tie a record set years earlier in the U.K. by an American rocker named Elvis Presley. But stunt or not, each of those singles charted in the British Top 40 as well. The WP has charted some 18





I leafed through a fashion magazine supplement recently and saw yet another feature on Goth style (fashion magazines love Goth). this one featuring a gallery of style inspirations over the years. And right there was a photo of the Sisters of Mercy. Thing was, it was the version of the band with just Andrew Eldritch and Patricia Morrison. This was the version that had a hit with "This Corrosion," but any Sisters fan — and I to some extent still am one — can tell you this was not the classic lineup of the band. The classic lineup featured Wayne Hussey and his creepy, beautiful 12-string-guitar playing.

After a falling out with Eldritch, Hussey and bassist Craig Adams split off to form the Mission, or the Mission U.K., as it was called in the States, Now, to Sisters fans like my sister and me, the Mission was a second-rate version of the real thing. That didn't stop us from buying the records and going to the shows, but we were total smartasses about it. When I went off to college, we used to sign our letters to each other, "Love, Wayne."

Flash forward a number of

years, and Wayne Hussey is touring behind his first solo album. It's a collection mostly of standards and covers like 'My Funny Valentine" and "With

or Without You." It won't make you want to sell your Chet Baker or U2 albums, but it's not bad. Eldritch hasn't put out an album in years, though he takes a version of the Sisters on tour whenever the coffers start

But it's a mighty plunge from a stylish stainless spoon to a grease-stained tin fork. A recommendation a few weeks ago from posse newbie Inta sent us to Hillcrest's Café Bleu, which has replaced the similar Crush. Inta was outta town, so our group consisted of the Lynnester; long, tall Ben-the-Stew; and rejoining us after long exile in a horribly boring Bay Area suburb, the much-missed Mark.

Despite its name, Bleu is physically a study in red, with unbroken, unornamented dark-red walls, except for the bar area along one side of the front, which is illuminated by twinkling blue lights left over from Crush. It's a long rectangular room with dark-painted wooden floors and naked wooden tables, and the lack of soft surfaces makes the room a bit echoey, but not so noisy you'd need to shout. Classic jazz plays softly in the background.

If you're at leisure to get there early (or if you call to reserve them), you may snag coveted seats at one of two mini-lounges: a big, plush couch near the front, which faces a table and two chairs; and, better yet, a parallel pair of chaise longues at the back, with a small table between them. Asking the waiter to peel you a grape would probably be pushing it. You certainly wouldn't ask the waiter we had for that — there was something a touch graceless there, a hint of pressure to order up, eat up, and get out, though nobody was waiting for our table.

The dark secret about happy hour, our waiter made amply clear, is that you not only have to arrive before 6:00 p.m., but your order has to reach the kitchen by that witching hour or your gown will turn to rags, your eating posse into mice, and you'll have to pay at least 25 percent more. We barely squeaked by.

Our choices varied from brilliant to just okay. None were awful, all were fun, and in aggregate we enjoyed our meal hugely — nibbling this, tasting that, gulping the other, while sampling interesting wines from a very smart, mainly affordable list that offers the chance to try most choices in half-glasses.

The appetizer knockout is the wild mushroom vol-au-vent, a buttery, crackling puff-pastry case containing wild mushrooms sautéed with garlic,



herbs, and white wine, finished with cream sauce, truffle oil, and Parmesan. What makes the dish is that the mushrooms are really wild. No, they don't take their tops off, but they're not confined to supermarket "wild" varieties like portobello and

shiitake. Here, the mixture included a generous portion of costly, succulent fresh cèpes (aka porcini) in long, thin slices. With their deep, suave flavor, these may just be the

third-best mushroom variety in the world (after truffles and morels). There were plenty of them to savor in the memorable tart.

A charcuterie plate (none of it made in-house) also proved satisfying, offering slices of French saucisson sec (like a milder salami) and saucisson a l'ail (garlic sausage) along with deliciously rich rillettes (meat cooked slowly in fat until tender, then shredded), with tasty herbed French-bread croutons, huge, tart caper berries, and coarsegrain mustard. (At sister restaurant Market Street Café and French Bakery in San Marcos, the sausages are made by a local artisan.) We didn't try the cheese plate (with honeycomb), but it, too, is clearly a winner: The choices from at least seven international cheeses are listed on a blackboard over the bar, and they're interesting and a natural for a wine bar.

An assortment called "Olives, Almonds, and Dates" offers savory marinated green picholine olives, candied Marcona almonds, and Medjool dates stuffed with pecorino cheese and wrapped

in applewood bacon. Problem, though, is the bacon was dried out, the dates withered with heat rather than plumped with the stuffing, and the cheese not gooey enough to compensate for the dryness. This doesn't compare to the juicy

chorizo-Mornay stuffed dates at Whisknladle — it's more like a suburban hostess's chic update of rumaki.

A salad of heirloom tomatoes with Italian water-buffalo mozzarella and prosciutto was rewarding. The garnet-colored tomato slices (perhaps one of those near-black, juicy varieties like Cherokee, or a Russian heirloom like Black Prince) were marinated in garlic and olive oil, served with pale-green chive olive oil and balsamic reduction, and both the cheese and prosciutto were fine. For me, a garnish of cantaloupe and honeydew balls slightly diminished the impact, their simple fruity sweetness stealing the stage from the dark, subtle impact of ripe seasonal tomatoes.

The corn chowder with lump crab was a disappointment. In late August, we all expected a blast of sun-drenched sweet corn, but the thin colloid was also thin in flavor. It just wasn't corny enough. For that matter, it wasn't quite crabby enough either, with merely a spoonful of the meat as a garnish in the center.

An onion tart was also a letdown, given my expectations, although many people like it very much, judging from other reviews and blogs. However,

I ordered it imagining something along the lines of André Soltner's fabled onion tart at New York's Lutèce — a reputed marvel of rich custard, deeply caramelized sweet onion shreds, and light, buttery pastry. This was more of a schematic diagram: a useless pile of frisée lounged along one side of the plate like a discarded green fright wig, and in the center, some phyllo sheets were topped with lightly caramelized sautéed onions and red pepper strips, surrounded by black niçoise olives and some puffs of pesto. This was less like Lutèce, more like one of those ten-minute recipes that get published in cooking magazines' "fast and desperate" recipe


sections. My friends didn't have Soltner's creation on their minds as I did, but they didn't much cotton to this shortcut version either.

If we'd been intent on eating only from the happy-hour menu, we could have filled up on more substantial starters fried calamari (which chef Stephen Clickner handles expertly, assuming he's using the same recipe he did when he was opening chef at Soleil @k a few years ago), sautéed mussels, pepper steak brochettes. And there were more salads to try, tooa Caesar, of course, and particularly, "Salade Bleu," with an iceberg wedge, bleu-cheese dressing, heirloom tomatoes, and Point Reves bleu-cheese crumbles. Couldn't be bad.

Had we staved wholly with happy-hour noshing (before the bell tolled for us at 6:00 p.m.), we could have gotten away for about \$25 per person, including beverages. But time ran out, so we moved on to the regular menu for a few more grazes and then a couple of entrées which included the house masterpiece. This drove up the bill to about \$50 each, all told, about the same as at the latest spate of "neighborhood restaurants" I've reviewed. (In this case, the extra dishes were necessary because it's my job to taste a lot of things, and the doggie bags afford helpful scrutiny of the leftovers under the mass spectrometer, aka a bright kitchen light.) You can easily split the price difference, eating the best and skipping the rest. And let me point you to the Sunday supper ritual, an ever-changing three-course prix-fixe meal with several choices for each course. for \$25 (plus \$17 for matched wines). Sheesh, what a deal!

Our non-"happy" grazes were a plate of canapés and an ahi tartare. Indeed, both left us somewhat unhappy. I ordered the ahi hoping for something like the visceral roundhouseright that hit me with this dish at Molly's a few weeks earlier, where the fish was superb and the dressing drove me to delirium. Here it featured ordinary raw tuna chunks in an unremarkable fusion dressing (sesame, sweet soy, ginger, simple syrup). The canapés, presented on a Gallic triple-tier server, consisted of the "chef's selection" of bite-size hors d'oeuvres. Six bites, nearly \$2 a bite. That night's selection: two tiny Manila clams, lightly dressed nothingness. Two little baked poufs of lump crab, pleasing. Two tablespoonfuls of duck confit in some very sweet dressing. Nice confit, 86 the sauce. After our dinner, I read somebody else's review (a respectable pro), noting that the two-way duck entrée (breast and confit) was classic and good, by which I hope the reviewer meant that the skin on the confit was ultracrisp and the meat moist. (Too often, locally, it's the opposite, with soggy skin and dry flesh.)

For entrées, zeroing in on the "Bistro Specialties," I chose bouillabaisse, just to be mean, since the failure rate on this dish

is ridiculously high in San Diego. I probably overemphasize authenticity in my view of this dish, so if you don't care, just skim all this stuff. Café Bleu's version is a minimalist sketch of the Provençale classic, rather than the Technicolor live-action version — although it's not terrible by any means. In Marseilles, a bouillabaisse is made from the day's by-catch and trash fish off the fishing docks on the Mediterranean, including a fair amount of net-bruised crustaceans that aren't quite pretty enough for restaurants to feature on their entrée plates. In San Diego, what you're likely to get instead are whatever entrée fish species are in the restaurant's fridge. At Café Bleu, where the chef buys fresh fish daily, you'll get what he wants to use up before tomorrow's fish comes in - and that includes

You receive a bowl containing poached pieces of a white fish species (the catch of the day), one single jumbo shrimp, one little scallop, a few mussels and Manila clams, and a pink hunk of mild-flavored Atlantic farm-raised salmon. (Salmon is a cold-water fish, so you'd never find it in an authentic bouill-abaisse.) Having all the seafood precooked separately is a great

idea, guaranteeing that each species is done just as much as it should be, not overcooked in the broth as so often happens. Riding across the bowl, like a Sherpa rope-bridge over the Dudh Khosi River, is a long, lightly toasted halved baguette, with a pile of rouille (red pepper aioli) in the center.

The waiter poured on the golden broth from a teapot the standard fish-stock/tomato/ fennel broth, a little light in flavor. Mark pinned it down: "I don't taste any crustacean shells contributing their flavors to this fish stock, or any saffron." Clasbouillabaisse usually includes shellfish shells to enrich the stock — not only more shrimps, but typically a clutch of langoustines — spare parts in the stock, best parts in the soup. In the U.S., many chefs substitute Maine lobster "culls" for pricey langoustine. (Missing a claw, about \$6 a pound wholesale on this coast wrong ocean, but a good substitution. Who could object to Maine lobster in anything?) "I agree," the chef told me later. "It's the downside of being such a small place. If I'm gonna keep the price-point down, I don't have the ability to bring items in just for one dish." Facing our bouillabaisse, the posse looked upon it and then, almost regretfully, broke the Sherpa baguette-bridge so that the rouille part of the crouton melted into the broth, as it should. It was more bouillabaisse lite than the authentic

Our other entrée was brilliant. As soon as the waiter set down the beef short ribs, Lynne's fine nose — from all the way across the table — could detect the vanilla bean that went into the marinade. The meat had been marinated in vanilla, black pepper, and wine, then braised to a fall-off-the-bone state before the sauce was reduced and the whole megillah plated over a scrumptious creamy mixture of celery-root purée and mashed potatoes. The vanilla raises it from comforting to sexy. This masterpiece, by the way, costs

thing, but it was decent eating.

just \$19.50.

Given the fabulosity of the mushroom vol-au-vent, I took another look at the entrée menu to see where the cèpes might appear again. Wild mushrooms are present in chicken and mushroom orecchiette (\$14.50) and in pasta Provençal (\$13.50). These look like good bets for gently priced entrées with silver-spoon flavors. A trout dish also includes wild mushrooms, but not the cèpes.

At the start, the happy-hour prices seduced us into a round of \$5 cocktails — could I possibly resist a "perfect margarita" for that price? Well, it was highly imperfect, lackluster and dull, tasting like a bar mix or too much simple syrup (boiled down sugar-water). Ben tried the Mojito, and it was so sweet he couldn't stand it, and neither could the rest of us. He switched to the Cambria viognier (\$5 happy-hour price, and they did

take the spurned Mojito off the bill). When the rest of us took a sampling sip, we realized that the wines were way better than the cocktails. From then on, we switched to various tastes of the grape. The half-glass option allows plenty of room to play at minimal risk. If you're looking for serious, high-quality reds with character, two choices leap out: a Heitz cabernet ('02) and a Châteauneuf-du-Pape ('04).

We didn't really want dessert, but when Lynne spotted profiteroles on the menu, we decided to gamble on them -Lynne hopefully, me cynically. Profiteroles are mini-cream puffs, easy to make well, even easier to make badly. Here, we suspected that the batter was overbeaten, as the texture was slightly tough and streaky. The puffs were filled with housemade vanilla, dulce de leche, and ultra-rich dark chocolate ice creams, dressed at table with flaming chocolate-rum sauce. Being a bit "PC"-inhibited, I let Ben and Mark make all the puns about "flaming." Back from godforsaken Fairfield, Mark seemed overwhelmed with gratitude for a decent meal. Or maybe he was just happy to be back in the posse again, down where a friend is a friend.

#### **ABOUT THE CHEF**

When I interviewed him at Soleil @k downtown, where he was opening chef, chef Stephen Clickner disclosed that, growing up in a small town in Pennsylvania, he'd spent his

high school summers working in restaurants. Once he got a chance to cook on the line, he realized that this was what he wanted to do for his living. He formally apprenticed for three years under a European-trained chef at a Five Diamond Westin resort at Hilton Head in South Carolina, continued on to work there after graduating, and then to work at the Westin in New Orleans. After a brief stint at Postrio in San Francisco, he hired on with cb5, a corporate food-consulting group that contracts with hotel chains to develop menus and recipes and, in some cases, to actually run the hotel restaurants. For a while, he worked at Rice for them; when cb5 sold Rice back to the hotel, he took a year off to regroup, then returned to the hotel scene to work at Soleil @k at the Marriott.

"When I left the Marriott," he said, "I took some time off because my son was born, and I spent about six months with him and my wife. I'd never had a son before — first time! I don't know what I'm doing! But then I had to go to work again to make some money. I ended up at a place in San Marcos called Market Street Café. I met the owner, and we talked for three or four hours, and I saw his vision, his goal, the direction he was going in, and I wanted to be a part of it. I worked up there for a few months, and we started looking for another property to open, and we found Crush for sale. So we ended up buying it,

and we revamped the whole menu.

"It is a big change to go from doing hotel restaurants to a pair of bistros, but it was refreshing. In a hotel, so many other things are involved that the chef is hardly involved in the food—he's involved in the menu planning, the ordering, the paperwork, the payroll; he doesn't spend a lot of time in the kitchen. I wanted to find a place where I could actually cook again. I love it. It reminds me of why I actually started cooking in the first place."

I asked if he did the pastries or had a specialist. "We trained somebody to do that," he said. "We hired someone who's still in culinary school, Elizabeth, and she has been one of the best people — so committed, such a strong workhorse, dedicated, and she's got the right temperament. If the food isn't right, she redoes it. So glad to find somebody like that.

"Our philosophy at Café Bleu is fresh, good food — with the opportunity to spend a little money or a lot of money. We want to get the freshest products we can. The presentations are simple, but the techniques are spot-on, and that's where we push our sous-chefs and line chefs to worry about the cooking.... We get the freshest fish we can, nothing frozen. We buy from local farmers [through Moceri produce company]. Almost everything we make here, we make from scratch — the ice cream, pastries, sauces, soups."

# **Ribs and Guilt**

# These babies melt in the mouth. Sauce is sweet, almost winey.

erry Toliver's a big guy. He's a rock drummer and tennis coach, and he looks like a young James Brown with a headband. So I'm not surprised he's put away a plate of rib tips and potato salad and mac 'n' cheese in no time flat.

His buddy Jerome has downed half a slab of baby back ribs with two cobs of corn. He needs his Wheaties as well: the guy's a tae kwon do karate instructor and also a tennis coach.

So I guess they can work off all these calories. Me, I feel a bit guilty coming in here — like,

cholesterol central. But I've passed by the sign that says "Baby Back Jack's Barbecue" in red neon above green window canopies a dozen times and longed to try it.

Thank the Lord it's Friday. Sign on the door says they close at 10:00 p.m. most days but not till 11:00 on Fridays and Saturdays. I ask somebody the time. "Just after ten," he says. Great. Look through the window. Busy. I swing in, up to the counter. Not quite sure what to have. Happens this guy Matt — he says he's from Kansas City — is just picking up his to-go order. Kansas City! Barbecue Central, right?

"So what-all are you having?" I ask, like mere mortal to mountaintop guru.

"This is my first time here," Matt says. "So I always start a new place with pork rib tips. They have more fat. Harder to screw up. I like it with fat. They're more tender."

Hmm. Sounds like a good plan. Truth is, though, I've never really understood what all these different ribs are. "Baby back"? From the back of baby porkers? "Spare" ribs? Pigs say,

"Here, have these, I don't need 'em, they're spare"? Didn't Eve come from one of Adam's "spare" ribs? Matt has gone, so it's too late to ask him. O'Neil, the guy working the counter, is too busy, and besides, I can tell he wants me to order.

Basically, the choice is simple. Baby back ribs, pork rib tips, "beefy" ribs, chicken, sandwiches, burgers, and salads. Each category starts at around \$6–\$7 and heads upward. A quarter-rack of baby backs with four bones — and two sides — runs \$7.99. The half (6–7 bones) is \$11.99, and the full

(10-12 bones) is \$18.99.

Pork rib tips, which have gristle "bone," are \$7.99 for the 6–7 "bone" dinner (also with two sides) or \$10.99 for the 10–12 "bone" dinner. Beef ribs run from \$6.99 (for one bone) to \$12.99 (3 bones) to \$18.99 (5 bones). 'Course, beef bones are gi-normous compared with piglets' riblets.

I'm sure the sandwiches would be good. Like, BBQ pulled pork or chicken (\$6.99) or beef (\$7.99) sandwiches. Then they have burgers, from \$6–\$8. A Cobb salad runs \$6.99, and chicken Caesar, \$7.99. Hmm...

Oh, right. I notice O'Neil. "While we're young!" he's saying to himself.

Hokay. "Six to seven bone pork rib tips," I say. Man of decision.

"Sides?"

Lordy. Baked beans, coleslaw, corn on the cob, cornbread, right down to sweet potato fries and onion rings. You pay \$1 extra for those last two.

I go for corn on the cob and cornbread, pay

my money, then head for a table. I look around. Sea-green walls, shiny rounded Formica tables. Nice. That's when I meet Jerry and Jerome. And at the next table, there's this family. Boy and girl and, turns out, their aunt and uncle. They're all chowing into baby back ribs and corn and yakking away. I swear. There's something primitivesocial about gnawing into bones together. Pretty soon the girl, Ajanae, is telling me about how she often goes to court with her dad. "He's the top defense attorney in San Diego," she says. "Thomas P. Matthews. I hear his speeches." She *critiques* his speeches. She's nine. Jesse, her eightyear-old brother, is a baseball talent. "He's already known as 'Triple-Play Matthews," says Consuelo, his aunt.

Oh, man. My ribs have been sitting here five whole minutes. Guilty as charged, your honor. Nattering too much, got caught up in things. I hate missing the hot and steamy moment they arrive. But I gouge into them, and tender? These babies melt in the mouth, just as Matt said they would. Sauce is sweet, almost winey. I don't get through the cornbread. Heck, I still have a couple of ribs staring up at me when I quit, and they start closing down the store. Gent who comes and politely tells me the end is nigh, turns out, is Jack. Hey! So there is a real Jack. He offers to put my stuff in a box.

"In the box, Jack?" I almost say.

Complaints? Only one. He doesn't have one of those split oil-drum cookers searing ribs outside like they do down at Croom's in Chula Vista, where you see the smoke, you inhale the sweet smell of the ribs from a mile away, and half the pleasure is following your nose to the source. Apart from that, hey, I'm hooked.

And cholesterol guilt? Not tonight. I get to the bus stop at Richmond and whack!? The night's last downtown bus has, like, gawn. So, great. Now I can walk these ribs off, all the way through Hillcrest to catch the last 120 at Fourth.



#### BEACHES

Adobe El Restaurante 9700 North Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-550-1000. Adobe offers California-Mediterranean creative seasonal dishes with locally farmed vegetables — try the fine, venturesome chipotle lobster bisque, tender roasted salmon, delightful dessert sampler. The resort is amidst a host of science and technology institutes and UCSD, and its kitchen sometimes must serve too many masters dedicated diners, hotel guests (including tots), conferencing technocrats, plus the usual parties and banquets. Hence, some of the food is a touch detuned to suit cautious and/or inattentive eaters. California wines exclusively, enough by the glass, most bottles over \$40. Full bar. No cell phones in dining room. Long trek from validated selfparking to restaurant; mobility impaired should call for directions to valet parking or to arrange lift by shuttletram from lot. Lacto-vegetarians easily accommodated to order. Resort casual, a bit dressy on weekends. Three meals daily (including Sunday brunch, when

rugrats eat free). Moderately expensive. — *N.W.* 

Bare Back Grill 4640 Mission Boule vard, Pacific Beach, 858-274-7117. This may be the first New Zealand food place in town, but that's not what keeps the customers coming in. It's BBG's claim that most of their meat is certified organic. The owners guarantee hormone-free beef and lamb, both from New Zealand, So, what to eat? Burgers, burgers, burgers — all kinds — from Prime NZ Angus to lamb burgers with wasabi dip. They also of fer chicken. Decor inside is strictly Kiwiland, from the all-black rugby shirt on the wall to the declaration of food principles. People who had given up on hormone-treated meat are coming here for their first burger in years. Open seven days, 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Broken Yolk Café 1851 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-270-9655. Breakfasting P.B.ers love this place for three reasons: its sundeck, its 26 different four-egg omelets (which you can split with your partner, no extra charge), and the challenge of omelet #27. This dozen-egg Broken Yolk Café Special comes stuffed with a mountain of mushrooms, onion, cheese, chili, plus home fries and biscuits. If you can down it in an hour, pay nothing — you've got huevos. If you can't, the yolk's on you — \$19.99. My advice: split a four-egger. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Bully's La Jolla 5755 La Jolla Boulevard, La Jolla, 858-459-2768. Despite the plasma TV sports screen, this place is very '60s. For example, dark, woody, plush red booths. And always crowded Word is, they serve more prime rib with au jus and horseradish than any eatery in San Diego. The Petite Cut eight ounce, their smallest, fills you plenty, with its baked potato and salad. But just once, come here with your main squeeze and order up the "full cut for two." It does a hang-ten over the edges. Or go bonkers and order the 32ounce cut (available in Mission Valley) — just to watch your neighbors' eyes bug out. Not flush? Try the Bully Burger, French Dip sandwich, or calamari sandwich. Lonely? Go to the horseshoe-shaped Low Bar. Lunch and dinner daily. — E.B.

Fairouz Café and Gallery 3166 Midway Drive, Point Loma, 619-225-0308. Seek out this family-owned-andoperated restaurant for wonderful Lebanese and Greek food. The owner, a noted artist, displays his paintings on the dining room walls. The extensive menu offers excellent lamb, stuffed grape leaves, and a wide selection of exotic vegetarian meals. Copious all-you-can-eat buffet available at lunch or dinner in addition to the regular menu. Given 24 hours, this café will prepare an astonishing Lebanese feast at low cost. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate. — E. W.

Great Moon Buffet 1840 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-273-6868. This is one of the classier Chinese allyou-can-eat buffets in town. They boast a glittering chandelier hanging in the octagonal entrance, plus over 150 items daily. Certainly they have great surf-nturf, like prime rib and jumbo shrimp or mayonnaise mussels. Or Japanese charcoal-grilled eel with sesame seeds on rice (unagi-zushi). It tastes salty yet caramel-y too. Eel-icious. Or Chinese baked crab meat on crab shell. Add crab legs, and maybe some roast duck. Cramming? Feast today, fast tomorrow. Dessert fruits include loquats, pineapple, peach, longan. Open daily, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — E.B. JRDN 723 Felspar Street, Pacific

Beach, 858-270-5736. It's a day at the beach: Befitting a restaurant digging its feet into the sand, the food here is fresh, fun, and unfussy, featuring sustainable seafood, natural meats (including truly tasty spice-rubbed steaks), organic/local produce, and a separate sushi bar. The dishes cover the waterfront, ranging from mac 'n' cheese to die for to a sexy, fruited gazpacho to swoon over. The chic interior, relaxed atmosphere, and great grazing draw an exuberant, youngish crowd. Creative cocktails are part of the charm, along with a venturesome wine list with plenty by the glass. Tables (reservable) on the heated beachfront patio could easily become a summertime lifestyle. Validated valet parking. Just one lacto-vegetarian entrée, but vegetable sides plus salads fill in amply. Bread available by request only. Lunch weekdays, brunch weekends, dinner nightly. Entrées expensive. — N. W.

**Kabuki Sushi Restaurant** 4475 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-270-1986. This place has a unique system of delivering tempting dishes to you via boats floating along a minicanal that surrounds the sushi bar. You take food off and pay according to the plate size. The sushi chefs — they can be a show in themselves — have the usual panoply of sushi, sashimi, nigiri. The dragon rolls (crab, shrimp tempura, eel, avocado) and spider roll (soft-shelled crab) are tasty too. It's young and crowded here — is that because you don't have to sweat the menu, just grab what you like off the boat and chew? Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday to Saturday; dinner only Sunday; closed Monday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

Karinya Thai 4475 Mission Boule vard, Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie *The Beach*, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes get-ting off on the coconut curries like gang ped, panang, and kang kari. Or noodle dishes like the famous pad thai. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai origins. The tom vum kung (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table. the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course *nam pla*, Thai fish sauce. A nice counterpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: pad talay, a saute pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in *The Beach*. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

La Jolla Brew House 7536 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-6279. Don't expect to see the beach. Do expect to taste some good beers made right here and good solid food, such as the prime rib sandwich (which goes great with their Russian Stout) or the roasted potato. Or maybe best of all, the buffalo burger - big, hefty, and low on cholesterol. You'd call this a family, multigenerational sports bar eatery. Nice mix. It's La Iolla, so it's not dirt cheap, but the guys here seem really interested in making interesting brews and good food to accompany them. Open for dinner seven days; lunch Tuesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. E.B.

La Jolla Rancherita 7404 La Jolla Boulevard, La Jolla, 858-459-5877. Most of the year this modest eatery serves a standard border-Mexican menu (antojito combos, a few typical entrées) running toward the mild side

but with a wider, more interesting assortment of fresh salads than most of its ilk. (Hey, it's La Jolla!) But when local spiny lobsters are in season (typically from late October to about February), here's one place that gets them live and does them right — and you don't have to put up with a frat party or tourist scene. The good-size, juicy critters (at least a pound each) are halved and gently grilled (not abused by the usual lardy deep fry), and come with two melted butter dips, tart coleslaw, and comforting mashed potatoes. The lobsters aren't on the written menu but are treated as specials. Call before you go to make sure they're on hand that day. Full bar. Moderate. — N.W.

Latin Chef 1142 Garnet Avenue, Pacific Beach, 858-270-8810. In a tiny, cheerful (and noisy) storefront with a small street patio, you'll find Peruvian and Chinese-Peruvian cuisine carefully cooked with rare, authentic ingredients, including chanchitos (special toasted corn kernels) to nibble instead of bread. The ceviches are brightly refreshing, and in papas huancainas, potatoes are treated to a suave golden cheese sauce. The outstanding anticuchos (heart kebabs) are impeccably seasoned; for a perfect Peruvian flavor, ask for the *aji verde* (green hot sauce) for dipping. Lomo saltado (sautéed beef, veggies, and fries) is made with tender sirloin. *Aji de gallina* (spicy chicken) is a family recipe that's deliberately detuned for kiddies; the hot salsas ( the medium-hot green or the hotter red one) will perk it up. Chaufas, Chinese fried rice dishes, are popular with local Peruvians. No alcohol; BYO in a paper bag or try chicha morada, a refreshing sweet drink made with purple corn. Friendly, articulate owner is happy to explain the cuisine and culture. Difficult street parking. Three vegetarian entrées plus several meatless appetiz-ers. Reservations vital. Dinner weekdays, lunch and dinner weekends. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Mardi Gras Café 3185 Midway Drive, Point Loma, 619-223-5501. The Creole cooking at this café/grocery, to eat in, take out, or have catered for your next party, is sound and tasty, if deliberately underseasoned (just add salt and hot sauce to taste). You can also buy the real and rare ingredients from the freezer, deli case, and grocery shelves, including Cajun tasso (spiced ham), boudin blanc (rice sausage), and crawfish sausage when it's in season.

Daily brunch through early dinner. No alcohol, everything available for takeout. Inexpensive. — N.W.

Michele Coulon Pastries 7556-D Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-5098. The daughter of Don Coulon (retired chef-owner of the Belgian Lion restaurant) presides at this delightful little café/bakery. (Look for it behind the octagonal sandwich shop that fronts its mini-mall.) Every ingredient is fresh and of top quality. Cakes are light, moist, rich, and available as wholes, slices, and even "miniatures," plus you can choose tarts, chocolates, ice creams, and breakfast pastries. Open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Moderate. — N.W.

Ocean Beach People's Organic Foods Co-Op Deli 4765 Voltaire Street, Ocean Beach, 619-224-1387. This is the land of "organic," "cruelty-free," "environmentally safe," "shadegrown." Vegan country. People look either disgustingly healthy, disturbingly pasty, or just plain smug. But the food tastes pretty good. And they sell it by the pound so you can mix and match. 'Course, you have to learn new words, like tempeh (cultured soy which can be made to taste like anything). And dishes have a sensible momsy East Coast feel — garlic eggplant with beet root and onions, tempeh loaf, sweet squash and rice, millet spinach bake, shepherd's pie, "mango madness," tempeh sausage, steamed vegetables, vegan macaroni and cheese. Bottom line: it's guilt-free. Open seven days, breakfast, lunch, dinner ("serious" breakfasts daily except Tuesday and Thursday). Inexpensive. — E.B.

#### BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52 when calling Mexico.

**El Cid** Lopez Mateos #993, Baja, 646-178-1809. This restaurant is at the heart of the tourist district, but the cooking and service are way above coach class. Look to the Specialties section of the huge menu for the most interesting selections. Crisp quail with rose petal sauce (famed from *Like Water for Chocolate*) proves outrageously delicious, and the seasonal *chiles en nogada* (meat-stuffed poblano chiles with walnut cream and pomegranate) gain refinement from greaseless ground sir-

loin. Fish dishes are fresh, rich, and tender, and you'll find nine different ways to enjoy a steak. If you can handle a tableside production number, crêpes with *cajeta* (caramel sauce) make a very grand finale. Fully bilingual staff; English menus available. Vegetarian on request. Sidewalk patio dining available. Reserve for weekends during tourist peaks. Full bar, with excellent margaritas, Baja wines. Open daily, continuous service breakfast through dinner. Moderate. — N.W.

Fonda Roberto's Avenida Cuahutemoc #2800 (at Agua Caliente Boulevard, next to CESUN Universidad), Baja, 664-686-4687. How often do you get to eat something totally new? Like huazontle, the Aztecs' "red spinach" Roberto's presents it as an egg-covered mass of baby sprigs wrapped around a sausage of Monterrev cheese, all swimming in a chocolatey mole sauce. You haul the *huazontle* branches through your teeth to de-seed them, just as Montezuma did 500 years ago. This is the fascination of Roberto Reyes's eatery. It's a tribute to his home state of Puebla in the heartland of Mexico. Cactus plays a big part: Dedos de Moctezuma ("Montezuma's fingers") is cactus stuffed with steak; torta de camaron seco is a shrimp patty topped with cactus; cecina Oaxaquena is cured meat with cactus salad. But there're also steaks, mole poblano (chocolatey chicken with seven different chiles), and the delicious chile en nogada (chile pepper stuffed with beef, fruits, and nuts — fried in egg and covered with creamy nut sauce). Vegetarian upon request. Nice dining room too — built around a fountain. Open 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.; closed Monday. Moderate. — *E.B.* 

Lonchería La Poca Lucha Municipal Market, Avenida Niños Héroes #105, Baja. Venturing to the far end of Tijuana's Mercado Municipalis like entering a scene from The Sorcerer's Apprentice. Shafts of sun penetrate the dark of an incredible kitchen of great black iron stoves and giant steaming pots, and hoods gathering into black pipes that snake up and out through the roof. But what a welcome! As you walk through the mercado, ladies

bounce up, enticing you away to their eateries. Hang in there till you reach Loncheria La Poca Lucha, "The Small Struggle Lunch Place." Ask for carne de puerco (pork), chiles rellenos, bistek ranchero, or higado al gusto (liver), all around \$3. Pescado frito (fried fish), milanesa con papas (veal with fries), pollo frito (fried chicken), and carne asada are slightly more. Price includes soup, steaming hot corn tortillas, and a soda. Open seven days, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Inexpensive. — E.B.

#### CENTRAL

Alambre's Mexican Grill 756 Fifth Avenue, Downtown, 619-233-2838. Surprise: this place strives to be inexpensive, like a Mexico City café-bar, where you hang out to watch soccer or talk over the night at two in the morning. They keep the kitchen open till the wee hours. Breakfasts are decent workaday deals, like the burrito stuffed with chorizo, spuds, and eggs. Try the interesting *chicharon de queso* that looks like a foot-long golden scroll, and watch for the impulse-cooked teaser plates like *cebollitas*, small grilled onions in Maggie's sauce. Specialty is



many Greek-influenced dishes. The new restaurant still cleaves to its parent's old San Diego ways (e.g., ingredients aren't impressive, and all entrées come with the same veggie medley), but the competent kitchen turns out some delicious dishes, especially pastas (try the linguine de Kathleen), specials, and reasonably thin-crusted, interesting pizzas. The interior is bright white, and very loud; the roofed and heated back patio is dimly lit and quieter. Wine, sangria, beer. Take-out orders accepted by phone. Reservations advised. Moderate (pastas) to expensive. — N.W.

**The Better Half Bistro** 127 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-543-9340. "Explore — don't bore!" is the unspo-ken motto of world-traveled chef John

Kennedy (a veteran of the kitchens of Thomas Keller, Charlie Trotter, and Daniel Boulud) at this civilized little haven for fearless foodies. The globe provides Kennedy's flavor palette, while his techniques are rigorously French. The seasonal menu ranges from frog legs to antelope and includes that rarity, a housemade charcuterie platter (right down to the mustard). Sunday brunches include house-smoked bacon and an outgrageous "Monte Cristo" of beer-battered fried bread filled with pork and duck confit with foie gras butter. But that's just the start of the creative ethic here: Phone 24 hours ahead. and he'll cook you just about whatever you want. A Chef's Whim tasting menu is aimed at the growing crowd of regulars — like *omakase* at a sushi bar, it's designed not by the night but for the individual, to please each diner's par-ticular palate. The restaurant is named for its vast array of wines by the half bottle (lots of great French choices) as-sembled by owner-sommelier Zubin Desai. Or bring your own prized bottle

— corkage is minimal. Vegan, vegetarian, gluten-free meals on request. Two shallow steps up into dining room, but heated dining courtyard is wheelchair accessible. Reservations a must. Mod-

Bite Bistro and Wine Bar 1417 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-299-2483. Chef-owner Chris Walsh, longtime culinary saint of Hillcrest, cooks up the inventive California tapas he's known for at this lively, local spot. The flavors are Mediterranean-influenced with original touches. The top of the hit list includes a foie gras crème brûlée; luscious poached oysters with truffle chive butter; and witty foie gras medallions with tropical fruit and pine-nut brittle (Perigord meets Dollywood). Grilled Japanese eggplant with beet carpaccio, lamb meatballs, steak frites, and berry sabayon are nothing to sneeze at, either. Bring friends to share with. An eclectic international wine list of-fers loads by the glass and bottlings at a wide price range, but don't miss the fragrant, seductive cocktail of prosecco

with rose syrup. Tuesday nights, bar-gain-priced (\$20) prix fixe dinner. Wines half off on Mondays. Grazing dinners Wednesday through Monday; open weekends until 11 p.m. Individual dishes inexpensive to moderate, but they add up. — N.W.

Bleu Bohéme 4090 Adams Avenue, Kensington-Talmadge, 619-255-4167. Restaurateur Philippe Beltran's classic French bistro, tres chic but informal and quite noisy, emphasizes familiar favorites from the old-fashioned, Frenchin-America, bourgeois-cuisine restaurant repertoire — dishes like Burgundian escargots (perfect), a lightened cog au vin (nice) and Mediterranean bouillabaisse (nearly fatally compromised by wrong-tasting coldvater species like salmon and halibut). But in this restaurant-starved, fashionconscious part of town, many patrons adore the joint. (Chacun à son goût.) And at the end you can feast on an air-light soufflé glacé au Grand-Marnier, almost making the dinner "worth a detour," as they say in *The Michelin Guide*. Smart, mainly French wine list includes wide choice of tasty, affordable "food wines," with lots by the glass and half bottle; full bar with creative martinis. Small parking lot, sidewalk patio seating in fair weather. Lunch and dinner daily. High moderate. — N.W.

Buga Korean BBQ Restaurant 5580 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Clairemont, 858-560-1010. Here you'll find a full range of engaging traditional Korean dishes as well as tabletop gasfired barbecue featuring Coleman Nat-ural grass-fed beef and premium Berkshire pork. (There's also a sushi bar.) Dinners include plenty of pan chan, small plates of savory relishes that make the meal special, furnishing an everchanging array of piquant flavors. Aside from the BBQ meats (which you should order last, to leave table room until you're ready to turn pure carnivore), some tasty treats include simmered black cod in hot and spicy sauce (dinner item #7), miso soup with pork (dinner item #4), stone pot rice, bibimbap (dinner item #22), mandoo dumplings (casserole item #13). Few vegetarian choices. Bar items include Asian beers, sake, soju. Can get noisy. Dinner reservations advised. Open daily, lunch and dinner, moderate prices, with special prix fixe BBQ and Korean dinners available for groups. — N.W.

**Busalacchi's Ristorante** 3683 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-298-0119. Remember Olympia Dukakis in Moonstruck retreating for comfort to her lo-cal trattoria? Busalacchi's has that settled, warm feel, but it's more interesting. Multi levels create nooks and crannies for *liaisons dangereuses*, or there's the streetside casual level. Niche fountains and faux-marble columns make it feel old-fashioned. Being Sicilian, they have plenty of the tomato-sauce-dominated dishes (like *torta di* melanzana, eggplant layered with moz-zarella). But also try the excellent calamari piccata, a calamari steak bathed in butter, mushrooms, lemon, capers, and white wine. Simple but delish. Or sal-ads like *insalata di fileto* with filet mignon, goat cheese, walnuts, eggs, and arugula. And hey, if you want to keep the budget intact, nothing wrong with spaghetti della casa. Lunch Monday through Friday; dinner nightly. Moderate to expensive. — E.B.

Café One Three 4107 Park Boule vard, University Heights, 619-260-1311. This is the neighborhood café that every neighborhood wants. It's small but smartly decorated and offers a heated outdoor dining patio to escape the noisy interior in good weather. The fare is a light, healthy, seasonally changing menu of interesting dishes with flavors drawn from all over the globe and featuring mainly locally grown produce. The tortilla soup is just right, and the savory beef-less meat loaf (of turkey, pork, and veal) is probably tastier than Mom's, and certainly lighter. At least two vegan entrées and plenty for lacto-vegetarians. A glassed pastry case reveals the dessert chef's daily array. The California wine list offers plenty of affordable bottles and glasses, like a true bistro (with halfprice bottles Wednesday and Sunday nights). Reservations advisable. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Friday; three meals Saturday; brunch only on Sunday. Moderate, with inexpensive early-bird weeknight dinners. - N.W.

**Cantina Mayahuel** 2934 Adams Avenue, Normal Heights, 619-283-6292. Here, you're in a Latino-chic world, but don't be afraid to order simple things, like shrimp or beef tacos. Larry Auman, the owner-chef-artist, makes you feel you're in Mexico City or Veracruz with his masks and yellow-wash walls and those awesome, interesting tacos. The Caesar salad is wonderful, too. Try it with mahimahi or shrimp. Also look for specials like Chili Colorado (slowcooked beef) or Yucatán seafood stew with salsa, habanero, and ginger on black beans and rice. For all the folk-industrial glamour, we're talking Latin-American comfort food. This cantina is what San Diego should be: bicultural. Bring both languages. Open noon to 10 p.m.; closed Monday. Inexpensive. —

Celadon Royalty Thai Restaurant 3671 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-297-8424. The menu was originally devised by a chef who cooked for the Siamese royal family. Some dishes taste luxurious, and all the dishes taste authentic — and carefully prepared. The regular entrees offer a choice of sauces (red curry, green curry, etc.) with your choice of protein, but go straight to the Chef's Specialty items on the menu to find the best and rarest. Stuffed chicken wings are extraordinary, seafood soup talay is fabulous, and among the entrees, don't miss *choo chee duck* or the Queen of Thailand's favorite, pineapple fried rice. Lunch Monday through Sat-urday, dinner nightly. — N.W.

City Delicatessen 555 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-295-2747. Some folk come for the Jewish food (chickenin-the-pot, brisket of beef, chopped liver), others to soak in the art-deco colors — the cornucopia of fruit above the entrance, the mustard vellow walls, the black-and-white checkered tile, or the flower bunches of red, blue, green, and yellow lamps. And then some come for both: the stuffed cabbage roll (with ground beef and rice inside) is a glowering red ball with maroon, oniony, sweet-and-sour raisin sauce to die for, set off by green parsley and bright or-ange slices. Scandalously delicious. Downside? Our pastrami sandwich tasted dry and chewy by comparison. But City Deli is less strictly Jewish (they have bacon on their breakfast menu) and more of an everyday New Yorkand more of an everyday New 107k-style eatery. Waitstaff are good-hu-mored, and the Seeburg Wall-o-Matic tableside jukeboxes actually work. Bring plenty of quarters. Breakfast all day; early-bird dinner specials; late-night dining. Open from 7 a.m. till midnight; until 2 a.m. Friday and Saturday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

**Darband Fifth Avenue Grill** 1556 Fifth Avenue, Downtown, 619-230-1001. Darband is named after an exotic mountain resort north of Tehran. Quite a contrast to this sloping office-and-car-park strip of Fifth. Lunchtimes, office workers fill the tables Evenings feel more, well, Persian. It's mostly men, some playing backgammon, talking, arguing, laughing. With all the Farsi flying round, it feels like a local café back in Tehran. Food is good, fresh, regular Persian, Khoresh Bademian is a tasty baby eggplant and beef stew. Barg is a safe bet, too - marinated beef tenderloin with rice. So is the vegetarian plate, though the veggie wrap's cheaper. Of course, kabobs star, as do yogurt-y, cu-

The nightly specials and the waiter's recommendations for the freshest catch will lead you to the evening's best entrées. Fish dishes are exquisite, and anything with calamari (fresh local catch) is worth ordering; Atlantic shellfish, though, tend to be a tad overcooked. Reserve, and dress on the spiffier side - some Hollywood celebs hang their Borsalinos here, upping the clothing curve. Dinner 5 p.m.to 11 p.m. weekdays, 5 p.m. to midnight weekends. Park Boulevard, Hillcrest, 619-298-8661. Basically a Greek deli, but charming, especially if you're into patios. Inside has painted grapes, hanging copper pans, and framed pictures of Paris cafés. The most popular dish is the lemonroasted chicken, but if you love lamb, Paul's Special, with potatoes, salad, and pita — Fridays and Saturdays only — is the way to go. (They do offer lamb sandwiches daily.) Other good dishes include the Veggie Diabolou pita sandwich (hot and spicy), the ground beef moussaka plate (eggplant, potatoes, and bechamel sauce), Greek chicken soup and, of course, gyros. But go just to play bon vivant on the patio. Open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday, till 5:30 p.m. Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Extraordinary Desserts — Bankers Hill 2929 Fifth Avenue, Banker's Hill, 619-294-2132. Patrons looking for a quiet dessert still cling to the original charming cottage near Balboa Park. Those wanting more of a meal head for the newer Little Italy location, a vast, noisy space with industrial-chic decor and a menu of eclectic small plates — mezze spreads, bruschettas, sandwiches, and cheese plates. Flavors tend to be intense; some creations (such as a bacon-cured salmon sandwich and pantelleria, a celery-date spread) are wonderful, others are exhausting even in small portions. Both locations offer pastry cases full of desserts that live up to "extraordinary," to eat on-site or to take home. Chef-owner Karen Krasne incorporates flavors inspired by the global reach of her travels, from the cooking schools of Paris to the rice fields of Bali. The white cakes are food for angels. Georges on Fifth 835 Fifth Avenue, Downtown, 619-702-0444. This steakhouse is in a historic building that was once a hangout of Wyatt Earp - it now boasts faux-Victorian decor and amusing wall art. Formerly Roger's on Fifth, it was owned by former mayor-felon Roger Hedgecock; now Roger's rabbited and left it to his partner George Harrington. It's still wildly popular with conventioneers on expense accounts. The menu offers Prime and ultra-Prime steaks, some of it at jaw-dropping prices
— although entrées do include free vegetables. Ask for sauces on the side un-less you like them thick and heavy. Some of the best items are non-beef: the cold seafood appetizers ("lobster martini," oysters, tuna tartare) and a juicy grilled pork chop. This two-story Midwesterner-friendly eatery caters mainly to tourist families and conventioneers, but the upstairs Ovster Bar is a pretty spot to chill out and watch the sailboats over a good margarita and a plateful of iced bivalves. Upstairs preparations tend toward simple American coastal dishes; the menu includes more appetizers and the drinks include artisan beers. The downstairs main dining room features more old-fashioned "haute" preparations and has a longer wine list but no view. All foods and drinks from both venues are available by request on both floors (but not all servers know this). Parking free with validation for two hours. Reservations strongly advised for after 6:15 p.m. any evening. Accessible via elevator from main dining room, with entrance on the park (south) side of the building. Lunch and dinner daily upstairs; dinner only downstairs. Moderate to expensive. - N.W.

Hawthorn's Restaurant 2895 University Avenue, North Park, 619-295-1688. When this long-standing Banker's Hill restaurant moved to spiffy (if quite noisy) new digs here, the change proved positive in every way. Menu choices are now fewer but better, with superior ingredients including

varied and seasonal locally grown vegetables matched to the individual entrées. The kitchen now does more from scratch, and you can taste all these improvements on the plate. The fare is Mediterranean-American with Mexican touches. Most desserts outsourced. Wide-ranging wine list, full bar, corkage a reasonable \$15. Reservations recommended, especially on weekends. Expensive. — *N.W.* 

Islander Grill 3645 Park Boulevard, North Park, 619-297-3929. Here's a chance to sample the unique tropical cuisine of Guam, an island at the crossroads of the South Pacific. The cooking includes traces of Mexico, the Philip pines, Japan, and Hawaii — all filtered through the spicy Chamorro palate. Try the chicken *kelaguen*, a citric salad resembling ceviche, or the brilliant coconut shrimp (available as a starter or entrée). Stews are flavorful: The saucy ipot roasti is definitely not your mother's, unless Mom's from Guam, and the chicken stews are equally savory. Other choices include a range of salty, teriyaki-style barbecued meats barbecued chicken in a less salty marinade, plus numerous exotic appetizers. Free parking in small hotel lot. Everything available for take out. No alcohol. Lunch through dinner daily, early dinner Sundays. Very inexpensive. – *N.W.* 

Jayne's Gastropub 4677 30th Street, North Park, 619-563-1011. You'll find great appetizers for sharing here — not pub grub, but fine, sophisticated southern-European treats like savory hummus, tasty fried calamari, and Spanish-style shrimp with garlic. Main courses run to comfort food and are rather a matter of taste — the

younger drinking crowd eats 'em up, while seasoned gastronomes aren't always as enthusiastic. Either way, it's a hip, nabe hangout for those who can handle ear-busting noise. In good weather, seating on the back patio relieves the sonic overload. Full bar with excellent wine and beer choices. One vegan entrée, one vegetarian-adaptable pasta. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Appetizer dinners moderate, mains moderate to expensive. — N.W.

Pierre's Place 1404 Fourth Avenue. Downtown, 619-727-4700. Guys twirl pizza dough like they were in Cirque du Soleil. Other kids run back and forth cooking, serving. Who'd guess they're all homeless teens who live and study here at the Toussaint Center? This eatery's new, smart, a mix of quarry stone, blond wood, sea-green chairs, red walls, brown leather couches, and full bookshelves. Food's good, too, You might say nouvelle Italian-Californian Think California Pizza meets Father Joe. Interesting dishes like Florentine breakfast panini, Tuscan chicken panini (nice and squelchy with provolone, red peppers, pesto), and the Italian Special (toasted Italian roll with salami, ham *capicola*, provolone). The "vanillages" gelato, with bits of apple pie, ain't half bad either. 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. seven days. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Puerto la Boca 2060 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-4900. Argentines love their beef and they love it lean and wholesome - freerange and grass fed. That's what you'll find at this uncompromisingly authentic outpost of Buenos Aires cuisine. The great national entrée is the mixed grill (parrillada) for two or more — a massive meatarama featuring numerous grilled cuts of marinated beef, chicken, and sausages. Start with luscious beef or corn empanadas or, if you're feeling hungry and adventurous, matambre (rolled beef galantine). Not a steak lover? Try the shrimp la boca. Don't eat meat? There are vegetarian pastas and pizzas, Gnocchi (ooquis) are served only on the 29th of each month. International, affordable choice of wines, plus Latin and U.S. beers. Full bar. Patio dining. Daily lunch and dinner hours, with dinner menu all day Friday and Saturday. — N.W.

Sausage King 811 W. Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-297-4301. Not too many delicatessens in the county still make their own sausages, luncheon meats, and jerky. But the German couple who run this place do. They make an unbelievable 34 different sausages and luncheon meats, plus 10 different smoked meats like turkey, beef, Westphalian ham, Black Forest

ham, and even bacon. For lunch they will make you a really cheap bun-sand-wich filled with anything from home made liverwurst to blood sausages to salami. Two would really fill you up. As with the nearby cheese shop (see Venissimo), the Starbucks at Falcon and Washington is a good place to chow down this unique sausage experience. Open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

**Sidebar Deli** 225 Cedar Street, Downtown, 619-525-1444. The motto of this place is "Every day's a good day, but some days are better than others." It certainly applies to the Sidebar, just because the daily specials can be gone in a flash. Students have fought class actions to secure lunch specials like spaghetti and meatballs with garlic bread. Of course there are always breakfast burritos, breakfast sandwiches like bacon or sausage and cheese, French Dip sandwiches, or California wraps. Open to the public, breakfast and lunch, weekdays. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Sister Pee Wee's Soul Food 2971-1/2 Imperial Avenue, Golden Hill, 619-236-0470. One of the oldest, best soul food cafés in the county. Sister Pee Wee says her lunch and dinner menu depends on what she feels like cooking that day — you might find big pork ribs with mashed red-skin potatoes, black-eyed peas, collard greens, and two-inch-thick corn bread, or Southern-fried chicken, or catfish filler with all the trimmings. Sister's special is chitlins and catfish. (Call ahead about the availability of chitlins.) Breakfast includes eggs, bacon, ham, sausages, and hominy grits. Weekdays 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., Saturday to 4 p.m., Sunday closed. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Starlite 3175 India Street, Little Italy, 619-358-9766. No pedestrian pub grub at this lounge — nearly all the major staffers are protégés of now-departed Michael Stebner, conduit of the Alice Waters's ethos of local and natural. Chefs hang out here off duty. The seasonal menu of California-Mediterranean cuisine features naturally raised meats, house-made pasta and sausages (do try the house-made sausage plate!), and local produce. The Jidori chicken and Prime flat-iron steak are knockouts, and for dessert let your inner child commune with your outer adult over the irresistible toffee-chip ice cream sandwich. Short, smart, merciful wine list with French and California wines at way-below-average markups, scanty by the glass. Full bar with creative cocktails. About seven lacto-vegetarian dishes, one for vegans. Age 21 and up

only. Free parking lot attached. Dinner nightly, moderate. — N.W.

The Strip Club 340 Fifth Avenue Downtown, 619-231-3140. This grillyour-own steak joint is a homage to Golden Hill's Turf Supper Club — but if Turf is a low-budget indie cult film. Strip Club is the Gaslamp's big, brassy, high-budget Hollywood remake (even though prices, like those of movie tick ets, are roughly the same). It's loud and handsome, and if the USDA Choice steaks (available in numerous cuts) are not quite as flavorful as Turf's, they're still good enough for the price - and you can take them up a notch with numerous spice blends and sauces on hand at each gas grill. Other choices in clude burgers, chicken breast, ahi tuna steak, and meat or seafood kabobs (the shrimp is particularly good, with pep-pers, onions, and meaty hunks of portobello mushroom). Entrées come with salad and puffy, cook-it-yourself garlic bread, resembling hamburger buns with gigantism. Six veg and starch side dishes (including two types of gluey mashed potatoes) are available at extra cost; desserts are commercial ice cream novelties. Casual, no reservations, street-patio dining available. Over 21 only, no minors even with adult accompaniment. Dinner nightly, open until 2 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate.

**Venissimo Cheese** 754 W. Washington Street, Mission Hills, 619-491-0708. Just don't ask for Velveeta here. Everything else, they've got: 60-plus varieties of cheese, most from Europe. But a meal? Yes. You can get a baguette style sandwich stuffed with cow cheese sheep cheese, goat cheese, fruity, moldy, runny, stinky, any cheese in the house, same price, around five bucks. Even Boschetto cheese, with truffles in it, which sells at around \$30 per pound or Napoleon's favorite, stinky Epousses Berthaut, or the beautifully tangy Schloss. Plus you get grapes or a pear to go with the sandwich. Where to eat it? Starbucks, a few doors down, usually doesn't mind. Coffee, bread, interest ing cheese, fruit — it's the perfect combo. Open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Yakitori Yakyudori 3739 Sixth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-692-4189. Yakitori are the Japanese equivalent of satay or mini-kebabs — little grilled skewers of grilled or fried goodies, each marinated and/or garnished to flatter its nature. Making a meal of them is as much fun as eating Spanish tapas — but more exotic. A highlight here is kawasu (chicken-skin salad, divinely tender and unrecognizable in its dressing). Tender fried tofu, skewered pork with

shiso, chicken heart, and octopus fritters are among the standouts — but all variations of the less-challenging beef skewers are wonderful, too. Posters on the wall list the "top tens" of Japanese and American clients, and between them they'll guide you to the best dishes. Arrive early, preferably on a weeknight. No reservations, small restaurant fills up fast. Happy hour weeknights 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. with discounts on drinks and appetizers. About six vegan dishes (if you discard bonito flakes) plus salads, tofu, rice. Gets noisy as night progresses. Dinner Wednesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W.

#### **NORTH INLAND**

Buca di Beppo — Mira Mesa 10749 Westview Parkway, Mira Mesa, 858-536-2822. People come here to celebrate, in party droves, by gobbling huge plates of "themed" Italian, Buca di Beppo ("Joe's Cellar") is a mighty national chain - but it works. Try the penne arrabiata with its spicy sausage or the popular chicken parmigiana. Standard stuff, but what the heck — you're having fun. Don't leave without conquering the mountainous, wicked Bella Festa, two huge balls of ice cream on double chocolate cakes running with sambuca sauce, caramel, and nuts on an 18-inch plate. Open for lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. -

Casa Reveles Mexican and **Seafood Restaurant** 29000 Lilac Road, Valley Center, 760-749-8041. "Revels," as the locals pronounce it, is probably the best restaurant in Valley Center proper, offering zesty, careful cooking with some unusually authentic flavors. The Michoacán-style carnitas (available in several "stuffed" dishes as well as an entrée) are outstanding for their moist smokiness, and the house's slightly crunchy fresh-tomatillo version of salsa verde is exciting. Seafood is necessarily frozen (given the inland location), but is handled tenderly. In fact, everything's a good deal better than it has to be, given the lack of neighborhood competition. Definitely worth a stop-off when heading to or from the nearby casinos. Late breakfast through dinner daily. Breakfast specials Saturday and Sunday until noon. Family atmosphere, but watch out for karaoke nights (Wednesday and Saturday). Full bar (cantina attached). Inexpensive to low moderate, with some three-course seafood dinners high moderate. - N.W.















**Crab Hut** 4646 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-1678. A local Vietnamese family runs this friendly, bare-bones eatery, specializing in Louisian-oid fried seafood and boiled seasoned shrimp, crabs, and crawfish. Whatever you order, you'll have a great time suckin' da heads and getting smeared with red sauce (bibs are provided and needed). But this isn't N'awlins — instead of seasoning by the boil alone, the crabs and crawfish are drenched in thick, spicy sauces ("medium" means "cavenne loaded"). And the light, tasty seafood gumbo with crisp veggies is more Asian than Cajun. Check the hanging board near the back for the specials and current crawfish condition. Live season runs from November through spring. Fried catfish filet and shrimp with lemon-pepper sauce are particularly sa-vory. No reservations, no veggies, nearest dessert at yogurt store next door. Crowded parking lot; come early on weeknights. No alcohol; no BYO. Lunch and dinner on weekends; weekdays, late lunch and dinner. Inexpensive to mod-

A Delight of France 126 West Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-746-2644. This authentic French bakery is one of the best in the region, offering daily baked authentic baguettes, brioches, quiches, and croissants, including a luscious almond croissant studded with nuts and laced with sweet almond paste. They claim to use all-oragine ingredients, even the eggs, and locally grown produce. For a hearty breakfast, you can choose omelets, frittatas, French toast, and eggs. Lunch dishes include several savory tarts, a French deli plate, crêpes, salads, and sandwiches. And ooh la la, there are dessert pastries, too. Open for brunch/lunch and predinner snacks Tuesday through Satur-

day; lunch/brunch only on Sunday. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* 

The French Market Grille 15717 Bernardo Heights Parkway, Rancho Bernardo, 858-485-8055. Ambience is served in generous portions at this romantic establishment with elegant indoor dining or a charming garden setting. The wine list has over 50 selections, including several available by the glass, and the varied menu offers Gallic dishes of duck, lamb, fish, veal, frog legs, and more. Most dishes are served with the usual French cuisine sauces, but if you're dieting, they'll gladly omit sauce. Ingredients and execution of the entrées can be inconsistent (e.g., some nights the fish is overcooked or the meat is tough, other nights they're fine) but the crabcake appetizer is always outstanding. Save room for dessert, especially the excellent crème brûlée. Open daily for lunch and dinner. Moderate. — S.M.

Hunan 16719 Bernardo Center Drive, Rancho Bernardo, 858-487-8131. This casual family restaurant serves the cuisines of two spicy Chinese provinces, Szechuan and Hunan — each with its own dedicated chef — but both chefs tone the spice way down to a suburban American comfort level. If you don't already know the difference between these neighboring cuisines, you're unlikely to learn them here. But you can have an enjoyable meal: Tea-smoked duck, eggplant Hunan-style, and shredded potatoes with pickled vegetables are the outstanding dishes. If you're planning on a multicourse feast, order your meal a few dishes at a time or everything will be served at once; the staff is accommodating but limited-English. Over 20 vegen entrees. Full bar, Chinese beers, generic wines. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — N.W.

#### **NORTH COASTAL**

Americana 1454 Camino Del Mar. Del Mar, 858-794-6838. Housed in a historic building, this casual breakfast/lunch joint turns into a serious dinner house at nightfall. The cooking rep resents the American melting pot, featuring worldwide flavors. Mornings, along with flawless eggs Benedict and utopian waffles, you can get a "Roman breakfast" of prosciutto, mozzarella, and fried egg on English muffin. At dinner, don't miss the lamb chop and eggplant appetizer or the duck breast with fig sauce. During summer, some of the veggies come from chef-owner Randy Gruber's home garden; the French fries (which don't come from his garden) are world class. To finish, a banana *tarte tatin* shouldn't be resisted. Thoughtful, reasonable wine list. Breakfast (until 3 p.m.) and lunch daily, dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Kids' menu available. Breakfast and lunch inexpensive to moderate; dinner moderate to expensive. — A.M.

The Bird House Grill 250 North Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-944-2882. A great place to check out real Turkish cuisine. The inside has a fine collection of blue-and-white wall plates and blue glass eyes to ward off evil spirits. Try the house specialty, Iskender Kebab (ground meat kebab, rice, tomato sauce, and house-grown yogurt) — "Iskender" means "Alexander." Or the Kofte plate (ground meat kebab, rice, salad, pita, and tzatziki sauce). The Shepherd's Salad is a traditional dish brimming with fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, onions, parsley, oil, and lemon. Good healthy Mediterranean diet. Even the baklavas are less gloopy.

Open Monday to Saturday, lunch and dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Carmel Valley 11602 Carmel Mountain Road, Carmel Valley, 858-675-4424. Two Beverly Hills lawyers started this chain in 1985 to exploit "the premium pizza segment." Some 150 restaurants later, guess it worked. The place is all shiny chrome, glass, etched palm trees, golden wood and black furniture, and two pizza ovens with real logs burning inside. The Original BBQ chicken pizza, the chain's first hit, is still their top seller. It has barbecue sauce, smoked Gouda and mozzarella cheeses, BBO chicken, red onions, and cilantro. The BBQ chicken chopped salad is good too, as is the jambalaya. If you've got a sweet tooth, but are embarrassed to order Hawaiian pizza, try the pear and Gorgonzola. It has caramelized pears, caramelized onions Gorgonzola and other cheeses, and hazelnuts. Inexpensive to moderate. —

California Pizza Kitchen -

**Knockout Pizza** 2959 Carlsbad Boulevard, Carlsbad, 760-434-4468. It's New York pizza only here. They make the pies with traditional thin, crisp crusts and toppings like pepperoni, meatball, garlic, and "whitestone" (mozzarella, Parmesan, ricotta, garlic, and spinach). Maybe their best is the "Bronx Special," an assortment of pepperoni, sausage, onions, olives, mushrooms, pepper and garlic. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Market Restaurant and Bar 3702
Via de la Valle, Del Mar, 858-523-0007.
Market occupies an odd location, way
out in the boonies of far-east Del Mar,
but it's worth seeking out. The menu,
which changes daily, is inspired by
whatever seasonal foodstuffs chefowner Carl Schroeder (formerly at
Arterra) finds at the local produce market (Chino Farms) and from the nearby
seas. Despite the ambitious food and
prices, vibes are neighborhood restaurant — people are having a good time
here, and so will you. For once, the appetizers and entrées are equally good,
with no letdown. At our visit, boneless

beef shortribs, North Atlantic monkfish, bluenose bass, and venison chops were all imaginative, with perfectly sized portions and intriguing sides. Appetizers may include celery-root soup, Maine lobster salad, bleu-cheese souf-flé, and a strudel of forest mushrooms and artichokes, all of them scrumptious — but the menu could be completely different when you visit, so be prepared. This is truly seasonal, local cuisine, and hurray for that. Dinner nightly. Reservations essential. Expensive to very expensive. — N.W.

El Q'ero 564 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-753-9050. You'll feel like a guest at an intimate party eating a leisurely dinner in this small, noisy, pretty dining room. Chef Monica Szepesy offers personalized, homestyle renditions of South American cuisines, including house-made beverages. Be sure to try the house's chicha morada, a tangy soft drink made from Peruvian purple corn. The fare includes numerous types of empanadas, tapas like small plates, and full-size entrées—most from the family homeland, Peru.

**St. Germain's Café** 1010 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-753-5411. Despite the Parisian name, the food here is all-American. Omelets are the café's best-known dish — 14 variations of three-eggers (or Eggbeaters by request) served with toast or a muffin, plus tasty herb-strewn café potatoes or fresh fruit salad. But don't overlook the Belgian waffles, scrambles, pancakes, Louisiana sausages, or the three versions of expertly poached eggs Benedict with genuine hollandaise. Sandwiches run to hearty American

classics (including some veggie choices), and along with beef burgers, turkey burgers, and veggie burgers, there are no fewer than six twists on a lean charbroiled chicken breast on a burger bun. The sheltered patio is always crowded, but there's a large interior dining room with a separate smoothies-and-ice-cream bar. Open daily, breakfast to late lunch. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* 

Tip Top Meats 6118 Paseo del Norte, Carlsbad, 760-438-2620. This geranium-splashed blue-and-white Bavarian chalet is more than a butcher's shop. It's a combination butcher-deli-diner. Enter through the bulging deli and listen for the shouts and clatter of serving ladies. Look for the "Es ist Wunderbar!" sign over the counter. Try German and American dishes like Big John's all-you-can-eat bacon, pork-link sausage, bratwurst, or ham breakfast with three eggs, home fries, and toast. Or the sausage plate: bratwurst, knackwurst, and smoked Polish with German potato salad and traditional stuffed cabbage. Owner Big John is a heavyweight Olympic boxer from the former East Germany with an M.A. in meat sciences. Generous portions abound. Friday through Sunday after 4 p.m., he roasts his famous prime rib dinner. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

**Trattoria Positano** 2171 San Elijo Avenue, Cardiff, 760-632-0111. If you're tired of Italian restaurants, you'll be revitalized by this one. Original recipes, wonderful fresh fish, nightly specials, excellent lamb and pastas. Very warm atmosphere. A treasure. Reservations accepted for parties of four or more; expect a wait at prime dinner hours, especially on weekends. Lunch and dinner six days, Sundays dinner only. Upper moderate. — *N.W.* 

#### **SOUTH BAY**

**Asian Noodle** 1430 East Plaza Boulevard, Suite E-12, National City, 619-477-5390. You've got to be a noodle fan to be into this. It's an outpost of the venerable Ma Mon Luk family's Filipino restaurant empire. Mr. Ma went to Manila from China nearly a century ago and introduced the idea of egg noodles in a chicken soup (instead of rice noodles). His now-famous soup (with beef or chicken these days) came to be called MaMi, (Mr. Ma's "Mi"—noodles). Yes, MaMi's a little bland, but it's filling, and their siopao (stuffed steam buns) make a good accompaniment. Most interesting is another invention Ma Mon Luk claims: sweet spaghetti. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Chez Loma French Bistro 1132 Loma Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-0661. Occupying a charming, cozy historic cottage a few blocks from the Del, this very French bistro has ceased its previous descent into decay, thanks to a change of owners in late 2005. They've introduced more careful cooking, fresher ingredients, more accomodating service. You'll still find all the classics of French bourgeois cuisine on the menu along with lighter, more modern dishes such as salmon crusted with horseradish. Don't miss the heartwarming Normandy-style onion soup flavored with apple cider. An adventurous wine list with interesting regional French bottles at modest markups adds to the pleasures. Three different three-course prix-fixe dinners (at varying prices) all offer good value, especially the early-bird super-bargain menu (\$24.95) available 4-6 p.m. nightly (all evening on Tuesdays). On Wednesdays, most wines are half price. Ground-floor dining room wheelchair accessible; specify when reserving. Dinner only, Tuesday through Sunday. À la carte expensive. — *N.W.* 

China Super Buffet 3007 Highland Avenue #9, National City, 619-336-9989. This buffet promises "over 100 items daily." Yellow-gloved girls constantly rove the rows checking, stirring, wiping. A lot of the stuff is very good, like the marinated baby octopuses that look like large blushing spiders, or the mussels in their shells, bubbling golden on top with melted cheese, and of course, roast beef au jus. If you must be healthy, they have groaning salad bars and adequate sushi. It's an incredible value. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Miguel's Cocina — Coronado 1351 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619437-4237. Although the cooking is blandly pleasant (even the guacamole is underseasoned), it's surprisingly painstaking. Soups are built on fine stocks, salads can be vibrant, and seafood is treated so tenderly that the numerous shellfish-stuffed tortilla concoctions (shrimp enchiladas, lobstre burritos) are positively luscious. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. — *N.W.* 

Mistral 4000 Coronado Bay Road

Coronado, 619-424-4000. Not just for tourists, but a lovely getaway for locals, the luxurious dining room with its wraparound windows on the bay is one of the most romantic spots in town with comfortable banquette seating, a view from every table, and an atmosphere that's quietly festive, not formal. The light, elegant, healthful Mediter ranean-style cuisine (northern Italy and southern France) emphasizes seasonal ingredients, as local and sustainably raised as possible, including herbs and some fruits grown organically on the resort grounds. Combinations can be witty and a bit whimsical. An excellent wine list at very reasonable markups is strong on half-bottles. (If you want a tasting dinner with matching wines, speak to the knowledgeable, trustworthy sommelier.) Inexpensive validated valet parking at the porte cochere of the main lobby. Reserve a few nights ahead, as many dinners here are sold out or special events. Dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Expensive. — *N.W.* 

#### **EAST COUNTY**

The Hideout Steakhouse and Saloon 27413 Highway 76, Julian, 760-782-3656. If you're a Harley-Davidson weekend warrior, this is for you: an old dark timbered roadhouse peeking out of the trees, with its own spring-fed water wheel, 3000 feet up the mountains. Back in the thirties, Hollywood celebs (Roy Rogers, Alfalfa, et al.) used to hang out here on huntin' and fishin' trips. Now, bike enthusiasts make it their weekend day-trip destination. It still has a 1920s fireplace roaring at one end, a big pot-belly stove at the other, a honkytonk upright piano, and a forty-footlong oakwood bar. Cheeseburgers are the default dish. Available are a "Texassized baked potato," vegetables, salad, and squaw bread. Open Saturday and

Sunday only. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* 

Paipa's Oasis 5469 Casino Way, El Cajon, 619-445-6002. Forget gambling — gamble through the slots till you pass under two huge elephant tusks. The "Joe and the Volcano"-style place with a fountain tower gurgling in the center is Paipa's. Pay the woman. Now decide: a lot of a little, or a little of a lot. The huge salad bar is surrounded by a groaning U-shaped table laden with everything from peel-and-eat shrimp to baked cod to Certified Black Angus prime rib. Keep coming back. Save them from throwing away this stuff. End with, say, strawberry cheesecake and coffee. Unlike the other suckers, you've gotten a return on your money. Moderate. — E.B.

**La Posta** 32337 Old Highway 80, Julian, 619-478-5600. Is the Wild West dead? Not out here. Swagger in past the rocking chairs on the wooden porch, by the "NRA meets here, every 3rd Wednesday, 7 p.m." sign, past bows and arrows, dream catchers, lariats, and brass spittoons, and swing into a chair. Now think vintage American food. Hefty anytime-breakfasts include two eggs, hash browns, biscuits, and coffee or eggs with chicken-fried steak or a bulging veggie omelet. ("With syrup" breakfast items, such as pancakes, stop at 2:30 p.m.) Their sourdough cheese-burger with fries or potato salad is big, or delve into a bowl of chili. Folks hereabouts talk about that chili in low, reverent voices. For dinner, the rib eve steak or pork chops is good enough to make city folks swoon. Three meals daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Trattoria Antica 5654 Lake Murray Boulevard, La Mesa, 619-463-9919. This is the Italian cooking of joy. New York expats, especially, will rejoice to discover fabulous food and warm hospitality to equal their Manhattan favorites — in a La Mesa strip mall. The indulgent, ambitious, full-flavored dishes are made with uncompromised Italian ingredients (e.g., San Daniele prosciutto, imported fonting cheese) and the Sicilianborn chef knows just what to do with them. This is *abbondanza* — not just abundance in portion size, but in the soul-felt appreciation of the pleasure of life. Wine (with lots of interesting Italian bottlings) and beer. Reservations strongly advised. Moderate (pastas) to slightly expensive. — *N.W.*

### **Got Smart**

These filmmakers have always been commercial. They have simply never been avaricious.

erception that the Coen brothers are running a little low on inspiration, albeit still nowhere near empty, will not now need to be radically revised. Remake: *The Lady-killers*. Book adaptation: *No Country* 

for Old Men. And their latest effort, Burn after Reading, even though an original, is at a glance a revisitation of their

favored stupidity theme. Back to the well once more. Much, even so, may be said in their defense.

The first thing to be said is that, no matter in how many ways and how many guises they have visited it (Raising Arizona, Barton Fink, Fargo, The Big Lebowski, that one above all, O Brother, Where Art Thou?, the secondhand Ladykillers, at least the Llewellyn Moss protagonist in No Country...), the stupidity theme remains timeless and timely in a country where George W. Bush can have twice — twice! — been elected President, and where the worst aspersion that can be cast on a Democratic aspirant to the office is "elitist." A thinking man might suppose that a competing Republican aspirant who owns seven

or eight houses could be tagged a kind of elitist, too. But after all, a poor man has an easier time in identifying with, or envying, the rich man than a bonehead has in identifying with or envying the egghead. It takes less

imagination. It takes no more than, to put a fine point on it, stupidity.

The next thing to be said is that, although no overt politics emerge, the placement of the stupidity theme within the Washington, D.C., intelligence community is highly strategic, calculating, revitalizing, resonating, and, well, intelligent. (The memorable line from the original Manchurian Candidate swims up from the depths: "Intelligence officer! Stupidity officer is more like it.") True to form, true as ever to their innate artfulness and integrity, the Coens do not permit themselves the luxury and convenience of a mouthpiece on screen.

The character railing against the "morons" and "idiots" of the world, almost invariably "fucking morons" and "fucking idiots," is a mid-level CIA analyst (John Malkovich) who, out of concern over his alcohol intake,





has been shoved off "the Balkans desk" and, in effect, out the door, whereupon he sets to work desultorily on an incendiary memoir, fastidiously pronounced "memwah," in between drinks and daytime TV game shows. We might recall that the anti-Hollywood railing in *Barton Fink*, to whatever extent the Coens would have agreed with it, was put in the mouth of a sanctimonious

swellhead.

The agent's flinty wife (Tilda Swinton) is meanwhile letting her hair down and pulling her knickers off for a tightly wound, twitchy T-man (George Clooney) who prides himself on never having fired his weapon in twenty years of "personal protection" service, and who, unbeknownst to the CIA man's wife but not to his own wife, is

a serial philanderer. (Both wives, while not the tiniest bit nurturing by nature, are professionally involved with children: pediatrician and kiddie-lit author.) In furtive preparation for divorce, the CIA wife prudently copies her husband's computer files onto a CD, inchoate memoir included, which finds its way, via the capacious purse of her attorney's receptionist, to the

locker-room floor in a Hardbodies Fitness Center. One of the cheerful trainers there (Brad Pitt) can't make heads or tails of the "secret shit" on it, but he feels sure that a Good Samaritan, indistinguishable from a blackmailer, would be due a reward for its return. Failing that, his conspiratorial coworker (Frances McDormand), in hopes of financing four separate cosmetic surgeries to "reinvent" herself, is prepared to peddle the disc to the Russian Embassy: "I told Mr. Krapkin I might be stopping by." (True words spoken: McDormand's body is manifestly "not a phony-baloney Hollywood body.") The stupidity theme has thus been interlaced with themes of deception, discontentment, self-delusion, double lives. The film, if I need to make it plainer, is a comedy, but a pretty deep

Another thing to be said for the Coens is that, however repetitive the theme, there is no slacking off in technique and execution. The fast hour and a half is consistently, uninsistently funny, with only a rare lapse in taste (a homemade marital aid, a couple of splashes of Scorsese-esque gore) and never really a lapse in tone. And although the regular and reliable Roger Deakins has been replaced with Emmanuel Lubezki (Children of Men, most noteworthily), the cinematography doesn't suffer, with its crystal-clear air, its fine-line focus, and its scythe-like camerawork, angling slightly upwards, attacking from all sides, intermittently cutting a path in a spurt of purposeful fluidity. Gratuitous beautiful shot: straight up into a falling rain from the neck-wrenching viewpoint of the CIA man when thwarted by a changed lock on his front stoop.

The Coens continue, too, to put to good use actors whom I thought priorly I disliked. One of these, Clooney, has become as tried-and-true a Coen repertory player as John Turturro or Steve Buscemi ever was (and seems, alas, to be no more). But another one, Pitt, is new to the team — though if I remember right, he had been attached to an earlier Coen project, a war film, that never came to fruition — and he has been entrusted with the brunt of the de rigueur hair humor, a flaxen streak in his whisk-broom bristles. It would not be intended as any sort of insult to say that he is completely credible as a birdbrain, conventionally amusing when boogeying to his inaudible iPod, but uniquely amusing when striving to be properly huggermugger, narrowing his eyes and dropping into sotto voce confidentiality. Pretty much the same could be said for the bilious Malkovich — the prior dislike, the newness to the team - except he has no hair and instead rubs his head as sensuously as any bowling ball was rubbed in The Big Lebowski. McDormand and Swinton, along with Richard Jenkins, David Rasche, J.K. Simmons, J.R. Horne, and Jeffrey DeMunn, I have no difficulty

The final thing to be said (not that there aren't more things that could be said) is that, after reaching the top of Mount Oscar with No Country for Old Men, and in spite of the blinding Star Power of Clooney and Pitt, the Coens are still the Coens. Joel and Ethan, cowriters and co-directors. Box-office receipts to the contrary, these filmmakers have always been commercial. They have simply never been avaricious. Never been panderers, never sellouts. If they have been held back in public acceptance, the reasons in large part would be because it's abun-

dantly clear that regardless how stupid their characters, they themselves are smarties. (Elitists, if you must.) They are not the Farrelly brothers. Dumb as their dumbbells. Burn after Reading typically offers the viewer no one to identify with, apart, that is, from the unseen Coens. (Notice, for instance, that while the Clooney character has a fascination with flooring, the Coens' camera disdains to follow his interest.) It divides its time democratically among all the main cast members, granting no special favors to Pitt and Clooney, who incidentally spend no more than a split second together. And, a lesson applied from No Country for Old Men, it perversely allows major developments to transpire offscreen. All of that shouldn't prevent its popularity. It should merely limit it.





Hancock — Two ideas prevail. The first may be summed up in the term "antisuperhero," or if you prefer it, "super-antihero." Why he bestirs himself to pursue criminals is not apparent, but he never worries about collateral damage in the course of that pursuit, knocking down freeway signs, piling up cop cars, taking chunks out of skyscrapers, racking up a \$9 million repair bill in just the film's opening chase scene. The personality, in short, of an above-the-law pro athlete or rock star. The second idea, a late turn of plot, cannot be divulged. Then again, it is not really worth divulging. Nothing more, for that matter, is really worth divulging, if only because of the decision - the bad idea — the anti-idea — to sign up Peter Berg as the director, bringing to this juvenile fantasy the same cinéma-vérité affectations he brought to the ripped-from-theheadlines terrorist thriller, The Kingdom, or to the football docudrama, Friday Night Lights, the same jiggly, wavery, zoomy camerawork, the same pushy, tight, tunnelvision closeups. black mark on the record of director Guillermo del Toro, whose record, which started out so clean with Cronos in his native Mexico and Mimic in the Hollywood system, looks now a bit ink-stained: Blade II, the first and second Hellboy, and nothing else that comes close to those first two. If the panegyrized Pan's Labyrinth (immediately preceding) was itself overly clogged in its visuals, his present production has a lot more money, more graphic design, more CGI, more costumes, more makeup, etc., with which to be clogged. Some sorts of viewers — the immature, the tasteless, the silly — will possibly see this scene as the highlight, but the more seasoned are sure to feel it disqualifies the movie from its subsequent ponderings of the destruction of mankind, the eternal tug-of-war between self-interest and the commonweal, and the would-be wrenching death scene at the climax. plode), although no apologies need be made for Meryl Streep, who, besides her lusty belting, supplements her usual emotion-plumbing with some peppy physicality; (d) that the natural settings, clearly, brightly, sunnily photographed, somewhat temper the inherent campiness; and (e) that this tempering, in a work of such fragile artifice, is not necessarily a good thing. To get down to a couple of specifics, the "Super Trouper" number on the eve of the wedding is a definite high point, and despite the shortage of competition for high points, the closing credits are well worth hanging on for, providing two higher points in the form of encores - twin peaks, if you please — with Streep and her bosom buddies (the blissfully confident



Man on Wire — Filmmaker James Marsh takes a novel approach to the topic of the World Trade Center, a caper documentary (to coin a genre) on the forty-five-minute funambulist stunt undertaken in 1974 by the Frenchman Philippe Petit, walking a tightwire between the Twin Towers. The events of 9/11 are never mentioned, but they're an irrepressible subtext in the found footage of the site before and during construction, and in the cloak-and-dagger planning and execution of the covert as sault on the Towers. One still photo of the wirewalker poised in midair even captures an overhead iet - at a safe clearance - in the same frame. Because so much of the film consists of present-day talking heads (interwoven with black-and-white reenactments and authentic archive footage), there's something a bit cov about the omission. Certainly the enormity of the later crime needn't be introduced in mitigation of Petit's mischief. But the disappearance of the Towers from the face of the earth would serve to underscore the singularity, the unrepeatability, of the stunt. Perhaps that goes literally without saying. And yet, if the Towers meant so much to Petit from the first moment he learned of the project (surreptitiously ripping a page out of a magazine at the dentist's office), then it would be only natural to solicit from him something in the way of an elegy. The documentary's function as a caper thriller, meanwhile, is on balance a success. The narrative information doesn't always come in the best order or fullest form, and it comes with a good many interruptions and side trips, but the details of the operation will often, for one reason or another, boggle the mind. Pleasantville — Twilight Zone-ish moralistic fantasy about two modern teens who are transported into the black-andwhite world of a Fifties sitcom, and who succeed bit by bit, against stout resistance, in colorizing it. Let's overlook the current cultural parochialism that equates blackand-white with the dull, the drab, the stunted, the repressed, the lifeless, the barren, while color signals the bold, the free, the daring, the rounded, the vivid, the vital. We must allow writer-director Gary Ross to lay down his own rules and set up his own symbols (though the contagion of color in Pleasantville, how and why it spreads through the community, remains a bit capricious); and the flowering of color in a colorless world seems a fair enough metaphor for the tapping of inner potential, the capacity for growth, the ability to change; and the intermixing of color and black-and-white in the same image, sometimes on the same face, is a technological marvel. In a movie, however, that purports to champion diversity, free expression, art, and the like, and to condemn narrowness, prejudice, censorship, and the like, it is hard to view the final and total extermination of black-and-white as any kind of unqualified triumph. Repression is repression, and the signs posted in store windows by the alarmed citizens of Pleasantville — "No coloreds allowed" --- would not go down better if rewritten as "No blacks or whites." The movie is never, even at its innocuous outset, all that clever and sparkly; and the positing of a Middle American utopia in which there are no problems whatsoever in which, as an example, the local basketball team never loses a game nor misses a shot - suggests an unfamiliarity with actual sitcoms of the Fifties. Ross's conception, from the first beady gleam in his eye, is strictly hypothetical and rigidly schematic, and the eventual harvest of his absence of humor is an abundance of preachiness, self-righteousness, smugness. Reprise - Norwegian film by the Danish-born newcomer, Joaquim Trier, traces the diverging literary careers of a pair of pissy-and-vinegary young friends in Oslo. One of them (the sallow Anders Danielsen Lie, with an institutional shaved head) has an earlier success, a mental meltdown, and a prominent girlfriend, while the other (the blond and robust Espen Klouman-Hoiner) comes on later but stronger, and would hardly be caught dead in the company of his girlfriend. Trier lays out these paths in an exuberantly youthy style — scrambled timeline, biographical digressions, hypothetical alternatives, know-it-all narrator such that you might think to look around to see whether there's not a swelling Norwegian New Wave. (Lifted snippets of Georges Delerue's music for Godard's Contempt — the same snippets lifted by Scorsese in Casino - call to mind another New Wave.) Much of the exuberance settles down as the film rolls along, and the people come to seem, despite the all-over pasty color, quite flesh-and-blood, quite real. **Tropic Thunder** — Major-studio satire on a major-studio Vietnam War epic. The slipshod plotting, the willful misinformation about how movies are made, and the pandering to the groundlings do not close off all avenues of inspiration. Four fake trailers at the top of the movie, introducing the motley cast of the movie-within-the-movie, give a hint of the allowable latitude. The ones of the over-the-hill action star (Ben Stiller, the movie's director and co-writer besides), the gross-out comedian (Jack Black), and the hip-hop gangsta (Brandon T. Jackson) are but a tepid warm-up to the topper, the one of the multiple-Oscarwinning thespian from Down Under (Robert Downey, Jr.), a monastery love story called Satan's Alley, a tony period piece aimed at the art circuit: the narrator's clipped phrases, pregnant pauses, and portentous tones are dead-on. Downey dominates the action in the Vietnam jungle as well, his character having undergone a "controversial pigmentation alteration" to play an African-American foot soldier, emphatically putting the grunt in the grunt. Vicky Cristina Barcelona — You can't claim that Woody Allen's rapid rate of production doesn't show. Even the title of this one sounds more like brainstorming for a title than like a final decision: three names off the chalkboard of keywords. Vicky and Cristina, two separate people, are dissimilar American friends, the first pragmatic and steady, the second capricious and restless, together visiting Barcelona for the summer. (Allen's British sojourn seems to be over, though he's not ready to come home.) The young women are picked up in tandem by a brooding Catalan artist with a legendarily tempestuous love life, flown off to Oviedo, seduced in sequence, separated by choice. Then the artist's ex-wife re-enters the scene after her attempted suicide, setting up a ménage. The film is almost more a sketch than a fully filled-in picture, a skeleton thin on flesh. (If Allen tends to hurry his ideas, it may be because he always has new ones waiting to join the queue. More than he can get to in a lifetime.) The dialogue, much of it in the writer's laziest declarative vein -

has not been polished anywhere near his brightest sparkle. And the dryasdust omniscient narrator spares him a heap of expository labor: "One evening Mark and Judy took them to the opening of a friend's art gallery." The half-baked aspect has its upside. In consequence of the cut corners and rushed development, a lot happens in only ninety minutes, and Allen can lay out on a broad canvas his vision of human discontentment and self-ignorance. He can lay it out as a pattern, not as an isolated instance. The complicating appearance of Penelope Cruz as the ex-wife, shrewdly put off till just past the halfway point, is a potent pickme-up in a flagging narrative, a powerfully physical, sensual, passionate presence that deliciously shows up the callow blankness of Scarlett Johansson and Rebecca Hall. WALL-E — Relentlessly sentimental science fiction about a cute anthropomorphized "male" robot — a rattletrap contraption of binoculars atop tank treads programmed to pick up garbage on an evacuated Earth in the 28th Century (his name is an acronym of Waste Allocation Load Lifter, Earth-Class), all alone on the planet but for the company of an indestructible cockroach, until his world gets rocked by the arrival of a smooth white egg-shaped 'fembot," whom he follows up to a mother ship of epicene, spineless, walrus-like humans. Rather remarkable for any movie are the long stretches of nonverbal narrative, reminiscent of the opening and closing stretches of 2001. (Other allusions to the Kubrick classic — the musical snippet from Also Sprach Zarathustra, the unblinking red eye of HAL-9000 — suggest the emulation is entirely conscious.) No less remarkable, in the context of a Disney computer cartoon, are the distinctive whiffs of postapocalyptic and dystopian melancholy. The happy ending pretty much ruins it. If the film wanted full credit for evoking those feelings, the best ending it could have held out would be hopeful, not happy. The Women — Update and opening-up of the old Clare Boothe Luce play, memorably put on screen by George Cukor in 1939 (unmemorably by David Miller in 1956), still an all-female cast despite countless scenes in the street, in a department store, in a restaurant, in a hospital — it gets a bit ridiculous. The luster, even overlooking the wan photography, is lacking. Meg Ryan, Annette Bening, Debra Messing, Jada Pinkett Smith, and Eva Mendes (the first two hog most of the screen time) hardly match the incandescence of Joan Crawford alone, never mind the added lumens of Norma Shearer, Rosalind Russell, Joan Fontaine, and Paulette Goddard. And the checklist of feminist talking points gives it a rather grim and driven agenda. Where went the humor? Vietnam-vet advisor, the company's guide to the Heart of Darkness), back home in Hollywood, where a heavily disguised Tom Cruise models a bald dome, bushy chest and arms, a bumpy nose, and a padded middle as a Harvey Weinsteinian bullying studio boss. (Funny notion: his everyday tough talk goes beyond anything ever heard by a cutthroat Asian heroin dealer and hostage taker.) If nothing else, the raging megalomania serves as a full-coverage mask for the actor's chronic overacting. # You Are What You Look Like

n Victoria Petrovich's set for The Good Body at the Rep, shiny panels reflect clouds and pale blue skies. Projected slides take us from America to Brazil, Africa, and Afghanistan. Standing on small pedestals, six female mannequins

face front, their size-two bodies tattooed with blue patterns. A beige Ab Rollerball, waiting to crunch another six-pack, sits on a raked, blue-and-white-checked stage. Eve

Ensler's monologues examine women's obsession with beauty — that launch-a-thousand-ships look that millions spend trillions to approximate.

Petrovich's slender mannequins comment on the mindlessness of pursuing a platonic ideal: they're

Ensler's famous for her Vagina Monologues, which led to V-Day (a global movement to end violence against women) and enabled Ensler to travel the world. She interviewed ethnically diverse women about their bodies. Most agreed that the one thing they would change was their weight. "Maybe I identify with these women," Ensler said in an interview, "because I have bought into the idea that if my stomach were flat, then I would be good, and I would be safe...accepted, admired, important, loved." Instead she has felt the opposite, "and my stomach is the carrier, the pouch, for all that self-

In 1978, Susan Sontag published Illness as

Metaphor, a still-important book about how people judge the infirm by their illness: disease reveals psychological failings; defects of character can bring about disease. In the 19th Century, people with TB were deemed "fallen" and punished for sins un-

named. To this day, faulty immune systems can incite negative speculations about the mental — and moral — health of the sufferer.

Ensler shifts Sontag's thesis from illness to the body as metaphor. Each imperfect body part becomes an outward sign, says

Ensler, "that you are born wrong and bad." And that you can always tell "good" people because they look "good." The Good Body attacks that attitude. Tormented

by her stomach ("my most serious committed relationship"), a character named Eve (i.e., Ensler) encounters 11 international women who have been able, or are still trying, to feel at home in their bodies. The subject and Ensler's findings aren't necessarily new (Naomi Wolf's 1991 Beauty Myth: How Images of Beauty Are Used Against Women takes a more in-depth look). What give the show its freshness are Ensler's humor, a soulbearing openness, and a splendid production at the San Diego Rep.

To open its 33rd season, the Rep has cast three of its most beloved actors: Carole Foreman, Deanna Driscoll, and Linda Libby — and they cut loose.



Brawn Gittings's excellent, around-the-world-in-80-intermissionless-minutes costumes, the trio excels with their roles and gives to each an unfettered emotional honesty.

When Tom first sees Helen in a crowded self-serve restaurant, she looks safe to him. He's sort of/sort of not going with Jeannie, a coworker. And Helen's a very large woman. So, there's no fear of sitting with her because, well, how could Jeannie object to someone definitely not his "type"?

But then, as he picks at a salad and she eats a foot-long wedge of pizza, Tom and Helen open up, share, laugh. Helen sees attractive qualities in Tom, possibly — dare she consider it? — a heart-meld. And she isn't what he expected at all (whatever that is). Helen's a librarian who loves Alistair MacLean war movies: maybe because his characters go headlong — where only "eagles dare" — into forbidden territory.

Author Neil LaBute always cuts to the chase, be it a screenplay (The Company of Men) or a theater piece (The Mercy Seat, an unflinching take on 9/11). LaBute's Fat Pig, now in a tight, thought-provoking production at OnStage Playhouse, is the second in his trilogy of plays about America's obsession with beauty—the one size few can fit. Unlike The Good Body's personal monologues, LaBute dramatizes the obsession from the outside. To change attitudes toward beauty, he suggests throughout, you must also change the eye of the beholder.

Against his wishes, Tom falls headlong for Helen. He's never felt as comfortable, as trusting, as elated. But come on, you can almost hear him say, he's a svelte Montague, and she's...a Capulet. As they grow closer, he moves her more and more indoors, away from the public eye. After they've been together for a while, most often in darkness, his company has a beach party. Should he invite Helen?

As Tom and Helen, Brendan Cavalier and Carla Nell do touching tandem work, much of it in unspoken looks and gestures. Nell plays Helen as if she's already read the script: been there, done that, even got the Tshirt. But she'll reach for the gold despite all warnings. Cavalier unites Tom's fears and honesty with revealing nervous ticks. His head and heart are miles apart.

Ryan Ross plays Tom's cynical office mate, the fat,

pigheaded Carter, with slick deliveries and convincing misogyny. Carter says, "You date all these gals and act like you're Mr. Sensitive...but you get bored or cornered or feel a touch nervous and you drop 'em like they were old produce." As jilted Jeannie, a smoldering Jenna Dawsey gets the comeback. Men, she says, are just "baby boys who run around in nice clothes." And "all they really want to do is breast-feed for the rest of their days."

#### All's Well That Ends Well

Most of Shakespeare's romantic comedies begin with an arranged marriage: the female's father chooses for her. But what if the golden slipper were on the other foot? What if the woman — Helena in All's Well - were free to name her mate with the King's blessing? And what if her intended-rich young Bertram— flat refuses enforced wedlock and would rather go to war than marry beneath his station? In effect, Shakespeare takes a social given of the time and dumps it on its ear. Helena persists; Bertram flees (and becomes a lying womanizer); then she really persists. At the Old Globe, director Darko Tresnjak relocates the play in Victo rian times, which allows Linda Cho to dress the cast in cold, formal charcoals, the soldiers in bright red and black. Tresniak counters the stiff-upper-lip surface with bawdy touches, including a frontal view of Michelangelo's Goliath-sized statue David upstage (and upstaging all below). As Bertram and Helena, Graham Hamilton and Kimberly Parker Greene are adequate. The fun's in the secondary roles: Jim Winker's crotchety King ("wrapped in dismal thinkings"), Kandis Chappell, Charles Janasz, and musicvoiced Celeste Ciulla. Bruce Turk is special as Parolles who, like Helena, becomes a threat to the male-dominated social order. Over the years, audiences and critics have had a

"problem" with the play. But I never have. Its perplexities are much more lifelike than most of the happy-enders (how many weddings have you attended where people whisper, "Give it six months" and are being optimistic?). All may be well that ends well, but at the ending of All's Well, Helena and Bertram have only just begun. Worth a try.

#### Boomers

Lamb's Players Theatre reprises one of its most popular shows. In this salute to the Baby Boom generation, when a guy sings a snippet from "Big Girls Don't Cry" a woman counters with "It's My Party and I'll Cry If I Want To," as if Lesley Gore wrote the song in response to the Four Seasons. Now in its fourth — fifth? — version, Boomers has grown a great deal since it premiered in 1993. It's added social dimensions (the original was mostly about middle-class whites), more period details, and a much better understanding of one's later years (gained from experience: authors Kerry Meads and Vanda Eggington are now 15 years older). Ostensibly the piece is a lecture about the generation from 1946 to 1964. A deliberately, sometimes annovingly, crotchety Jim Chovik recalls major events and provides statistics, from JFK to Kent State (but leaves out Jackson State!), from hippies to yuppies, marriage to divorce, and beyond. Themes from TV commercials and shows zip past, medleys of parts of songs cluster around a theme (Vietnam, relationships), and the evening unfolds like a game of "name that tune" in fast-forward. Boomers in the audience gulp "oh's" of recognition when a musical fragment triggers memories. One could wish that, at least once or twice, the company would do a whole song (let Anise Ritchie's Aretha-strong voice do all of "Respect" or Keith Jefferson all of "I Heard It through the Grapevine"). One could also wish that the characters weren't so one-note (Bill Doyle's hippie must express the same Owsley-marinated perplexity at least ten times). But the performances overall are quite good, as are Meads's direction and the four-piece backup band. You won't learn why the pump don't work or how good brown sugar can taste, but if you're of a certain era, Boomers will time-machine you back in a lively manner. 619-437-

#### Memphis

Although it felt born full grown to those it blew away, when rock 'n' roll first hit the scene, it didn't spring from Zeus's - or, more apt, Dionysus's — thigh. It required a small band of intrepid disc jockeys to cross borders and spread the feisty news. Among the originals was Memphis's Dewey Phillips, who fought an offbeat crusade for the music he called "red, hot, and blue." He died of heart failure at 42 - the Elvis of deejays Joe DiPietro and David Bryan's Memphis pays a double tribute: to the Phillips-like deejays whose hearts ran ahead of the times and to the city

of Elvis, B.B. King, and Johnny Cash. At the La Jolla Playhouse, Chad Kimball plays Huev Calhoun (i.e. Phillips), a white hipster eager to midwife black music to the world. In his first scene, Kimball establishes not only Huey's idiosyncrasies but also his bone-honest sincerity. Kimball rocks every tune and moves as if he's SDG&E's power grid. His performance is (a word misused these days to praise trivial things) awesome. Huey falls for Felicia, a talented African-American singer. Their taboo love's on a collision course with the blues. The at-times choppy script could stress Felicia's struggle more (to break a barrier you sometimes have to break your heart), but Montego Glover does such standout renditions of her songs that the production truncates applause — for fear of extending the running time by ten minutes? Memphis has many potential showstoppers (the first act could use a trim, but which of Byran's rafter-shakers do you cut?). DiPietro's book fights a battle between the actual and Broadway expectations. In some ways the energized first act doesn't prepare for the tonal changes in the second, which shifts from striving for a dream to costs paid in full. And the conclusion's an unsteady compromise between wave-the-banner-high uplift and Phillips's exit to oblivion (why not give Huey a belated wake; that way, you get both). The book stumbles here and there, but overall the excellent production's hugely entertaining. The first 20 minutes are so hot, in fact, if the performers

#### The Merry Wives of Windsor

Shakespeare on short notice: legend has it that Queen Elizabeth wanted a play featuring Falstaff in love. The Bard had, the legend says, two weeks to write the five-act comedy. The script takes longer than his others to get going. And once it does, it's mostly setups and punch lines. Shakespeare used a fascinating shortcut, however: he didn't have time to develop characters, so he gave them distinct voices and turned the stage into a Babel of warped idioms. For

the Old Globe, director Paul Mullins reset the play in the Old West. Ralph Funicello's versatile, stained-wood set becomes a dusty street, a dancehall saloon, and a moonlit forest (okay, the relocation doesn't work 100 percent). Denitsa Bliznakova's multilayered costumes make the transition from buckram to buckskin with ease. If the production has a concept, it would be "Merry Wives is goofy. We're honoring that. Enjoy.' Mullins's large cast communicates the fun of doing one farcical lick after another. As Falstaff, Eric Hoffman's opening night was, at best, okay. Hoffman pushed for emotional breadth almost to the point of straining his voice (plus, Falstaff relishes language as much as he does capons; Hoffman gave his words more utilitarian deliveries). Some individuals shine. Katie MacNichol and Celeste Ciulla, as the merry mistresses Ford and Page, bookend the show with schemes and class (a favorite bit: at one point they adopt a 19th-Century melodramatic style and frolic with histrionics). White hair down to his shoulders, Jonathan McMurtry looks like Wild Bill Hickock, until he draws his six-shooters and terrorizes the town. Wynn Harmon's Caius, a French doctor in an aqua jacket, malaprops amusingly. Deborah Taylor, Charles Janasz, and Sloan Grenz enhance scenes. And Bruce Turk, as Frank Ford, turns a minor character into a Falstaff-sized,

#### **National Comedy Theatre**

Improvisational comedy, making up funny stuff on the spot, is difficult enough. Years ago, however, Keith Johnstone thought it'd be more exciting if done competitively. He got the idea from pro wrestling ("where Terrible Turks mangled defrocked priests while grannies waved their handbags"). National Comedy Theatre, an offshoot of Johnstone's TheatreSports (artistic director Gary Kramer says the two compare like "rugby and American football"), resembles an athletic event more than an improv. Teams wear uniforms and compete on ActroTurf. Using sug gestions from the audience, they play "Emotional Sympathy," "Blind Line," and "Freeze Tag,

with judges awarding points to the best scenes. Klunkers and groaners get booed; quick wit rewarded (one of the most refreshing parts of the contest: people acknowledge failure, abundantly, then forget it). It makes for a lively, often funny evening. And Gary Kramer is one talented comedian.

#### **Night Sky**

Some of San Diego's better theater groups don't have permanent homes. The La Jolla Playhouse's new Resident Theater Company program — thanks to artistic director Christopher Ashley — has given Mo'olelo Performing Arts a place to stage its awareness-raising works. The inaugural drama, by Susan Yankowitz, goes inside the mind of a woman suffering from aphasia. Anna teaches astronomy: infinite space, dark matter, black holes. An auto ac cident damages her left brain, the language center: she can't match a word to an object or a thought (at one point a speech therapist illustrates the anguish by asking audience members to pronounce their names backwards). The subject arrests, especially if you know Yankowitz based it on theater legend Joseph Chaikin's communication disorder (years ago, Chaikin came to Sushi and read his and Sam Shepard's War in Heaven as best he could, unforgettably). The text, however, has gaps and, frankly, bad writing (the husband-wife relationship feels forced both ways: the ardent loving couple and the "bitch/loser" tirades don't connect with each other; frequent lectures on the wonders of space hammer home the obvious). Like Arthur Kopit's Wings, about a similar phenomenon, the story's predictable. Mo'olelo wrestles with the script, which earns, then loses dramatic tension. The production has a big plus, however. Seema Sueko puts you inside the mind of "Anna Aphasia": the horrific shock, frustrating therapy, lacerated dreams, living hopes, and, most of all, how it feels to be so cut adrift in one's inner space that words feel as far away as stars in the night sky. Worth a try.



#### Romeo and Juliet

For the Old Globe, director Richard Seer wisely sets Shakespeare's tragedy in its time. Romeo and Juliet lived when a land-based economy was still the norm. Vows, like marriages and one's social station, were permanent, and their love was absolute. Anna R. Oliver's costumes include the slashed fronts and sleeves of the period. Iron gates and stained-glass windows dominate Ralph Funicello's stainedwood set. And York Kennedy's splendid lighting finds that mystical source, somewhere above and to the side, that illumines the works of Tintoretto and Caravaggio: amid darkness the lovers glow. Stage pictures resemble paintings. Some echo each other, as when Juliet's hand reaches down for Romeo, from the balcony and from the tomb. But Seer breaks the picture frame, so to speak, when Romeo and Juliet address speeches to the audience. If the choice was meant to endear them to us, they don't need it (I can't think of anyone audiences could care more about). And including us in their private thoughts breaks their tragic isolation. The night I caught the show, Graham Hamilton - and the production overall — settled in about a third of the way through. At first Hamilton dashed off his poetry as if it were prose. Later he hit his accents and began to mean what Romeo meant. Heather Wood not only expresses Juliet's youth and intelligence, she has a naturally melodic voice that only rings false when she tries to add melody to it. The production offers strong visuals, and the

#### Troilus and Cressida

Shakespeare at his most philosophical, and irate. Goethe said, "If you would see Shakespeare's mind unfettered, read Troilus and Cressida.' It's the Bard's take on Homer's *Il*iad, but the "heroes" on both sides are slimy, self-regarding thugs who bounce around the Dardan Plain like overinflated balloons. And Helen of Troy's a weapon of mass destruction, an excuse for conquest

and nothing more. The love of the title characters doesn't just go wrong; it becomes the emblematic tale of infidelity. Goethe said "read" the play, not stage it. Troilus is a theatrical monster, demanding actors with muscular physicality and the chops to deliver some of the Bard's finest poetry. It last appeared in San Diego at the Old Globe in 1976. Aside from anything else, Compass Theatre deserves praise for attempting this epic task. Director Welton Jones and George Weinberg-Harter (who plays Pandarus and Agamemnon) have done a smart job of trimming a script that's literature when read but that waxes verbose when performed. The opening night, however, ranged from amateurish reciting to odd emphases to sprints through the poetry (if you get to speak the lines "when time is old and hath forgot itself/ When waterdrops have worn the stones of Troy," PLEASE don't mumble them at top speed to the floor!). Most of the cast (nine actors playing over 25 parts) had yet to internalize their roles. And the better performances - Michael Nieto as Aeneas and Ulysses, Adam Parker as Paris and a drooling





Thersites — exposed the others' weaknesses. The Compass production may, or may not, grow during its run. But then again, if the "past is prologue" for what's to come, this may be your only chance to see a Troilus in San Diego for the next 32 years.

Jack blamed his "surf karma" for his inability to catch a wave a couple weeks ago.

"So, last week I was out at Dog Beach, and I had been flirting with a girl in the car behind me. She parked and got out and I couldn't find a spot. I didn't want to miss talking to her, so I parked in a handicap spot. I got her number, but now I can't catch a dang wave. It's surf karma: do something wrong, the ocean knows. I always try to do something nice for the beach — pick up trash or clean up a mess, give back a little."

Jack moved here in 2006 and takes advantage of easy coastal access. Originally from Virginia, he grew up taking frequent trips to the Atlantic.

"It's not like I thought it was going to be [surfing in San Diego.] I thought, Hey, I'm in good shape. I will be able to hop on a board and just take off surfing. It looked so easy. My first day, June 9, 2006, I almost cracked a rib, got the wind knocked out of me, and stepped on a huge piece of glass. That was two years ago. totally hypnotized by him. I didn't have the guts to talk to him, but if he is reading this, man, you made my day!"



Another: "Honestly, I wish I could find a church with the same spirit of support and love.

#### **Government in Action**

 Florida's nation-leading epidemic of mortgage fraud was facilitated by state regulators who permitted 2200 people with finance-crime records to become professional "loan originators," part of the total of 10,000 with rap sheets allowed to work in the industry over an eight-year period, according to a July investigation by the Miami Herald.

- Two Cheers for Democracy: (1) Angela Tuttle was elected constable in Hancock County, Tenn., in August, simply because she showed up and voted. There were no candidates on the ballot, and thus her own write-in vote for herself carried the election, 1-0. (2) After Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's party retained control in India in the July elections, supporter (and Assam state legislator) Kishor Samrite decided to give traditional Hindu thanks for the victory. He sacrificed 200 goats and four buffaloes at a temple in Gauhati.
