

### **UNDER THE RADAR**

Price of admission Is Jerry Sanders in thrall to his biggest political con-



tributors? Some have thought so, especially as Sanders is said to harbor thoughts of running for statewide office in the notso-distant future. Now there is evidence that the San Diego mayor's actions are influenced by contributions to his campaign kitty. Two

weeks ago, Sanders announced the members of his new 17-member Citizens' Task Force on the San Diego Convention Center Project. According to a press release, the members "represent diverse interests — San Diego taxpayers, the Convention Center's fellow port tenants, the hospitality industry, organized labor and the business and economic development communities."

Well, yes and no. Big labor, not always friendly to Sanders, is represented by AFL-CIO

chief Lorena Gonzalez, but labor has always backed the City's big pork barrel projects. Then there is Lani Lutar, who runs the San Diego County Taxpayers Association, a downtown business lobby that has never seen a convention center or new stadium project it

didn't like. And there is Pete Garcia, chairman of the San Diego Regional Economic Development Foundation, another prodevelopment cheerleader. Task force cochairman (and port commission chairman) **Steve** Cushman makes no secret of his desire for the expansion. Diane Takvorian, head of the nonprofit Environmental Health Coalition, is the outlier of the group, having no obvious vested interest in the expansion issue. None of the 5 has given money to the Sanders campaign, according to a search of city records.

But that leaves the other 12 members who have, either individually or via company ties. Bill Evans, whose family owns hotels on City-leased land, has given \$1810 since 2006. Employees of Black Mountain Ranch, LLC, where Fred Maas is president, kicked in \$1470. Architect Mark Steele's M.W. Steele Group gave \$1500 to San Diegans for City Hall Reform, a Sanders-controlled political fund, and \$320 directly to the mayor's campaign. Richard Bartell of Bartell Hotels and family gave \$3180. Susie Baumann and husband Larry of the Bali Hai Restaurant contributed \$620. Executives of the Irvine Company, where Charles Black used to work, gave \$620. The San Diego

National Bank's Gordon Boerner gave \$640, as did Vince Mudd of San Diego Office

Interiors, and employees of Atlas Hotels, where Mike McDowell works, gave \$1380. Cox Communications honcho Bill Geppert, his wife, and fellow employees gave a total of \$2860. PR man **Bob Nelson** of Bob Nelson Associates and his workers came up with \$659.

And task force cochairwoman Cheryl Kendrick gave \$320.

Charity hole The San Diego Foundation, an aggregator of charitable donations that have sometimes gone to questionable causes, such as a fund for school superintendent Alan Bersin that was used in part to buy fine wines for a reception at his Point Loma residence, is trying to calm well-heeled donors about the effects of a recent Wall Street scandal. "The San Diego Foundation wants to assure all of our donors that we have no affiliation with Bernard Madoff, and that none of our investments and assets are impacted by this situation," says a statement on the foundation's website.

But the organization has not gone unscathed during the financial meltdown. Its financial statement for the period ending June 30 of last year, posted on its website two weeks ago after a reporter's inquiries, revealed that the foundation has dabbled in speculative instruments, including the collateralized debt obligations that are front and center in Wall Street's maelstrom. According to the document, the so-called CDOs are "supported by pools of residential and commercial mortgages," along with pools of other assets producing income, such as credit cards.

But when markets froze, the foundation couldn't get its money out. According to the report, the foundation recorded an "unrealized loss" on these auction rate securities of \$6.2 million last year and still held \$13.4 million of them that were "illiquid." Notes the

report, "The estimated fair value of these securities no longer approximates par value." In addition, the report said an interest rate swap agreement the foundation entered into had a negative value of \$501,000 and is reported as a liability.

### **Mira Mesa Meets Caltrans**


ranted, Mira Mesa needs traffic relief, especially for entering and exiting the I-15. But how does Caltrans justify a project

that is likely to increase already dangerous traffic next to a local elementary school? The answer might be to enlist some in the community to do the heavy lifting.

James Sullivan is not exactly a Mira Mesa community member. But he lives immediately on the other side of I-15 in Scripps Ranch. Over the summer, Sullivan succeeded in persuading Caltrans to put up a noise-abatement wall on the east side of the freeway. The wall will reduce noise levels at the 160-unit Scripps Towhomes where Sullivan lives. He is also the

beyond haranguing agency officials and to research how its decisions are made. He didn't just ask why a wall couldn't be put up, he tells me, "I learned the process they used. If they said the decibel levels didn't justify a wall, I asked to see the numbers and where they put the sensors." In some cases, Sullivan found, the sensors weren't even in the right places.

In going to group meetings, Sullivan occasionally witnessed community members berate Caltrans officials, such as Gustavo Dallarda, the agency's corridor director for the I-15 expansion project.



complex's homeowner's association president.

As a result of Sullivan's success with Caltrans, several planning groups invited him to attend their meetings and explain how they could get a noise wall too. He told them the key was to move

Sullivan commends Dallarda for always attending the meetings and doing his best to address local citizen complaints. Most of the time, Sullivan tells me, Caltrans's hands were tied by federal noiseabatement standards.

On October 25, when con-

struction of the noise wall was already under way, Sullivan and a colleague at Scripps Townhomes received an email from Dallarda regarding a bigger project. The draft environmental impact report for a long-planned direct-access ramp in Mira Mesa would be made public in November. The ramp is intended to take traffic from the west side of I-15, over the southbound lanes, and spew it into four new high occupancy vehicle lanes in the center of the freeway. Concrete barriers are to be moved according to time of day so that three of the center lanes are always available to the heaviest traffic.

"I thought I would give you a heads-up about [the project]," read Dallarda's email, which ended, "You may want to take a look and participate in the public comment process due to the proximity of your community." Three days later, Dallarda sent Sullivan another email, saying that the draft environmental document was then available to be read online or at the Caltrans office in Old Town, the Scripps Miramar Ranch Branch Library, and the Mira Mesa Branch Library. Sullivan, who previously knew nothing about a planned ramp, tells me he immediately dove into the report and learned all he could about the project. One thing he discovered was that, of two sites being considered for the ramp, the northern alternative would cause partial destruction of the noise wall he had labored so hard to obtain. (Environmental impact reports are required to analyze alternatives to the proposed project, plus a nobuild alternative.)

On November 6, Caltrans published in the San Diego Union-Tribune a Notice of Availability for the project's environmental document. The same locations for reading it were given, plus the website dot.ca.gov/dist11. The document is 379 pages in length. The newspaper notice also stated that a public hearing would be held in Mira Mesa six days later, on November 12.

### San Marcos soap opera

location for 30 years. The City asked them if they could find one on Fiesta Island. They suggested that small stretch of the dog-running area.

The commission says improvements should be for aquatic purposes. The dog lovers say that some of their pets are water dogs who swim in the bay. And the dog lovers have an organization, Fiesta Island Dog Owners (FIDO), and a website. "We have 3,500 members and over 6,000 signed letters to the mayor,"

says Dr. Jean Spengel, a veterinarian who founded FIDO. The group claims the paddlers are the obstinate ones: "If this continues, we will go to the city council. There will be 500 dog owners yelling and screaming," she warns.

But Les Hopper, spokesman for several boat clubs, says there are probably more than a thousand people who use Mission Bay for a variety of paddling activities. Sneeringly, he says that "At peak usage, there are only about a hundred dogs at the Fiesta Island site — an acre per dog." And "the majority [of owners] do not clean up

their dog poop."

But Spengel rejoins that if every recreational area were judged on dogs or people per acre, how could one justify a golf course? Moreover, the dog-exercising area "is used 365 days a year, from 5:00 a.m. to dark." She admits that 10 percent of dog walkers may not clean up poop, "but FIDO is now doing regular cleanups once a quarter. We had 130 people out there one day."

"We are good citizens," says Hopper. Each year, the paddling clubs sponsor programs for people in wheel-chairs and with spina bifida

and other disabilities, says Judith Moore. The paddlers plan to launch their own group, Fiesta Island for All, and set up a website, says Debbie Miller, who, like Moore, is active on behalf of the paddlers.

A year and a half ago, the plan for paddler accommodations got approval from the Mission Bay Park Committee. "The vote was 8–5 — hardly a ringing endorsement," snorts Carolyn Chase, environmental activist who has taken up the cudgels for the dog lovers. "More than 300 people attended with metaphorical pitchforks."

"It got very unruly," agrees Mike Singleton, principal at KTU+A planning and landscape architecture firm, which is honchoing the project. Several months later, the plan got approval from the Design Review Committee of the City Park and Recreation Department board.

The dog lovers say the paddlers belong across the bay at South Shores. But there are environmental problems there, says Singleton. "You can't do any grading" because of toxicity of the landfill, he says.

Steve Levon is a former boardmember of the Mission Bay Boat and Ski Club, which for two decades has claimed a spot at South Shores on the master plan. "During World War II, the Navy was burying barrels of paint in the general area," he says. If the toxicity problem were overcome, the boat and ski club would have first crack at South Shores, well ahead of the paddlers. The boat and

ski club has "a lot of members, and the club would be a revenue producer with a bar and restaurant." The paddlers would have no such advantages. Levon says there is a small area at South Shores that might accommodate the paddlers, but there would be no security for the boats, which are expensive.

"There are miles of underutilized beaches where the paddlers could use their boats," says Chase. FIDO has scouted several Mission Bay areas that supposedly have what the paddlers need. In addition to South Shores, they are Mariner's Basin and the north and south coves of Vacation Isle.

But Hopper says that they don't fit his groups' needs. "The canoes and dragon boats need calm, flat water. The outriggers are looking to get out into the ocean," he says. The southwest corner of Fiesta Island is ideal for those specifications. Also, the paddlers need safety. They want room to store the boats, which cost \$5000 to \$12,000. And they don't want to be too far from the water, because the boats weigh up to 1200 pounds.

"We haven't specifically evaluated all those other sites," says Paul Jacob, associate civil engineer in the City Park and Recreation Department, who is the project manager for the

southwest Fiesta Island plan that has degenerated into a scrum. The paddlers' usage of other sites would be incompatible with the Mission Bay Park Master Plan, the conditions of the SeaWorld permit, and the coastal act, says Singleton.

There is a huge question: money. The battleground project in the southwest corner of the island will cost \$20 million to \$30 million, says Singleton. "This is what we have been saying," says Spengel. "Why should a city that is broke put in roads and parking lots that will be accessed by a couple of hundred people? Why not save the \$20 million? If I were in a neighborhood in which they were closing rec centers, I would get mad to learn that the City is spending the money on Fiesta Island."

Singleton and Jacob are both aware of money constraints. "Times are tough now," says Singleton, but there might be sludge mitigation funds, Mission Bay lease revenue, and various state tourism-oriented grants available someday. In any case, the earliest this project could get under way would be four years, Singleton and Jacob agree.

Meanwhile, one monetary woe has beset Singleton's firm. There have been so many plan changes that his firm is \$150,000 in the hole on the project. Recently, the canine lovers convinced city council to see if the proposed road could be rerouted so that it doesn't cut so much into the dog-walking area. "They [dog lovers] have held up the project for years; there have been 13 alternatives, and now there will be 14," groans Singleton. "I am distressed at how much power dog owners have."

The dog owners have bite. They claim that Jacob has a conflict of interest: he is a paddler. Says Jacob, "I had used Mission Bay for years even before I was a paddler."

When he took on the job as project manager, "I knew I would be vulnerable to criticism, so I have had my consultant Mike Singleton conduct all of the contacts. I have had no direct contact with the parties, to remain impartial."

Of course, having direct contact with these combatants would be like getting in the ring between the bloodthirsty matador and the truculent bull. Better to let the consultant be in the middle.

if six days is enough time to allow the public to digest a complicated 379-page planning document. "It's a typical period of announcement that we use," he says. "If you make it longer, people forget about the meeting. Besides, a meeting of that sort is only one component of a longer

cians, including U.S. congressmen Brain Bilbray and Darrell Issa.

Mayor Desmond called Poway's mayor, the San Marcos Chamber of Commerce, and the Boys and Girls Club (where Holsizer serves as a boardmember) to complain about the emails. Councilmember Preston, meanwhile, thought Desmond's calls to his wife's employer were unethical and inappropriate.

In a January 27 North County Times editorial column, Councilmember Preston fired back. He wrote an op-ed piece stating that the city needed a code of ethics for all councilmembers — particularly Mayor Desmond — to abide by.

Preston's ethics code was the first item on San Marcos's January 27 city council agenda.

Instead of support for the ethics measure, four out of the seven public speakers railed against Preston's proposed ethical code. The concerned citizens said Preston is the one lacking ethics. They pointed to a future veterans' memorial sponsored by the city as an example. They said (and Councilmember Preston later confirmed) that Preston's personal website was the only way to obtain information and find out ways to donate for the memorial.

Upon hearing this, Mayor Desmond thought the setup was unethical and inappropriate.

"Let's clarify," Preston responded. "You're trying to go somewhere. The city asked me if they could put a flyer up on my website.... Maybe that's why we need a code of ethics to kind of clarify what's ethical in the council's mind."







period of notification and discussion. The public had much more opportunity [until December 8] to voice their views on the project before a final environmental impact report is published. And a direct-access ramp in Mira Mesa has long been known to be part of developing the I-15 corridor."

Until recently, however, the ramp has not been on many people's radar. Why, I ask, did you single out Sullivan for notice of the meeting almost two weeks prior to the public announcement? "He was hardly the only one," says Dallarda. "I informed a number of people I knew whose interests would be affected by the project."

But, apparently, Dallarda did not give advance notice to two elementary school principals, each of whose campuses is near one of the alternative sites for the new ramp. They didn't see it in the newspaper either. Community members gave them their heads-up.

The first is Hage Elementary School on Galvin Avenue. The northern-alternative ramp, which would require some destruction of the noise wall, would be built two blocks north of Mira Mesa Boulevard, leading traffic west past the school. The on-ramp would run 83 feet from the school's property. Everyone seems to agree that traffic problems near the school are

already severe. Ethel Daniels, Hage's principal, tells me that two students have been injured in traffic mishaps at the school. Not only would the northern alternative involve some destruction of the noise wall, the existing on- and offramps for I-15 at Mira Mesa Boulevard would have to be reconfigured.

The second school is Walker Elementary on Hillery Drive, a quarter mile south of Mira Mesa Boulevard. The school is less than a block west of where Hillery intersects Black Mountain Road. The southern alternative ramp would be built by extending westbound Hillery past Black Mountain Road east to I-15. The ramp at this site would cost less than half the northern alternative. According to the environmental impact report, the southern alternative was discussed on July 19, 2007, during a "public scoping" meeting at Walker Elementary.

Since the public notice, the danger of the northern on-ramp to children at Hage Elementary seems to have

elicited the most outrage in Mira Mesa. That doesn't make people feel good about how the southern alternative is likely to affect children at Walker Elementary. Nevertheless, the current traffic in Mira Mesa isn't convincing anyone that a "no-build" alternative is acceptable. Mira Mesans want to be able to enter and leave their community in a reasonable traffic flow.

Rochelle Dawes has been the principal at Walker Elementary for a year. She tells me by phone that she polled her teachers about the meeting that the environmental document claims took place at Walker six months before she arrived. None of the teachers remembered the meeting.

Excessive foot traffic near and through her school, says Dawes, is what makes an onramp nearby so dangerous. Students from Wangenheim Middle School, Mira Mesa High School, and Miramar College also walk along Hillery and cut through the Walker campus. "Plus," says Dawes, "most of my students arrive on foot. Of those who are dropped off by car, their parents are always driving in the exit and out the entrance. The traffic problems are already a nightmare." Dawes tells me that she stands out front of Walker in the mornings to direct traffic safely.

The environmental document admits that Hillery's traffic problems are already severe but says they can be mitigated by various traffic-

calming measures. Dawes isn't impressed by such statements. She'd like more specific solutions. Gustavo Dallarda, when he and I spoke, cited speed bumps along the portion of Hillery Drive west of Black Mountain Road as an effective way to discourage drivers from using that section of the street. He envisages the vast majority of cars approaching the Hillery on-ramp from both directions on Black Mountain and turning onto it east toward the freeway and away from Walker Elementary.

Ted Brengel, who is the president of the Mira Mesa Community Planning Group, tells me that he favors the southern alternative. The onramp, though an extension of Hillery, would be over a quarter mile away from the school, on the other side of Black

Mountain Road. But he bristled at a suggestion that his planning group take sides at its November 17 meeting, five days after the public hearing. The suggestion had come to him by email even before the hearing — from Jim Sullivan.

Sullivan opened the email by mentioning "some of the steps I've been involved with [regarding] my opposition to a northern direct-access ramp at Galvin Avenue." He then urged Brengel to place an "action item" on the planning group's agenda in favor of the southern alternative because otherwise "we will miss the December 8 deadline for public comment."

"I feel your pain," Brengel responded, "but I would like to ask you to change your approach." He criticized Sullivan for only helping alert

the Hage Elementary principal and parents to the danger of a ramp close to their school. "Perhaps you could do the same for Walker Elementary School and Wangenheim Middle School."

Sullivan feels the criticism was unwarranted. Walker Elementary people should have known what they faced after the meeting at their school a year and a half earlier.

"Two representatives from Walker Elementary came to the public notification meeting, the principal and another lady. The second lady came up to me afterward and said, 'Our kids are in danger too.' She was pretty aggressive. So I pointed out to her the chance her school has to get traffic mitigation. That can't happen at Hage on Galvin Avenue. 'So if I were you,' I said, 'I'd get


in there and lobby Caltrans very hard for good traffic mitigation and make them pay for it. If the on-ramp goes in down by your school, you could end up having better traffic control than you even have now.' By the time we finished talking, the lady seemed fired up," Sullivan tells me.

Why did Caltrans put the Galvin Avenue alternative in the draft environmental document? "Their officials will tell you they have to provide some alternative for the public to consider," says Sullivan, "but I think it was a red herring. Gustavo Dallarda alerted me early because he knew I'd jump in there and mobilize people to come out to the public meeting. And it was very well attended. The Hillery Drive alternative was his choice all along." ■



### STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

The other day I tried pulling out my thumbnail. I just yanked on it for a while but nothing happened. Nails don't look like the stuff around them. Are they just stuck into our fingers? What makes them impossible to pull out? This is really starting to bother me

and I need to know. Thank you.

— Anonymous, San Diego

I won't ask what you were planning to do after you'd pulled out your thumbnail. I suspect you didn't think ahead that far, but you might just keep that in mind the next time you consider trying. Nails might not look like the stuff around them, but they really are a version of skin. And a version of hair. In fact, your thumbnail is made of the same protein your hair is - keratin filaments. The first reason your thumb wanted to hang on to its nail is because the keratin filaments are growing out of deep skin cells. As they grow they become very dense and tangled and appear above skin level as dead, dried nail plate. So now we have your thumbnail connected to root cells behind the white "moon" at the base of the nail

Maybe because they knew one day somebody like you

would come along and try to pull them out, your nails are further attached to your nail bed (below the nail plate) and your nail fold, the skin around the sides and base of your nails. The fibers that connect your nails to the nail beds and folds are more flexible but just as tough as your nails.

But wait, there's more. Not knowing how easily you'd give up on trying to pull your thumbnail out, your nails added one more layer of protection, just in case. Seems that your nail beds and roots grow right out of a whole layer of fibrous tissue surrounding the ends of your finger bones. So, in the end, when you yank on your thumbnail you're actually yanking on your thumb bone. Just try and pull that out, Anonymous.

Hev. Matthew:

How long do cactuses live? They always look like

they've been there forever.

Yep. They just sorta sit there, it seems. Most only grow a few inches a year. But since they don't have growth rings like trees, and nobody's

hung around one cactus year after year to see how it goes, most estimates are educated guesses, pretty much. Short life span is maybe 25 years. But consider the saguaro. That's the typical cartoon cactus with the robot arms and sometimes a Mexican peasant leaning against it. Those puppies apparently have convinced botanists they can live from 150 to 300 years. Maybe somebody found Cortez's initials carved in one. Montezuma. Somebody like that. Anyway, all bets are off if the cactus is in a plastic pot on your desk. That probably has a life expectancy of six months, tops. Not because it dies, but because you get sick of it and throw it out.

Matthew:

Not that I'm planning to go into business for myself, but I was curious whether you could make heroin from the poppies that people grow in their gardens around here. As I understand it, heroin starts out as poppies.  $And \ if \ poppies \ are \ poppies, \ why \ couldn't$

hoods looking for a connection? Not that I'm planning on going into business for myself....

Well, keep it in mind, the way the economy's going. Though you'll have to move someplace else to set up your corporation, since the poppies we grow here are California poppies (Eschscholzia californica) and the dazed-andconfused kind are opium poppies (Papaver somniferum). Heroin is extracted from the white sap of the big immature seed pod of the opium poppy, in case you need a recipe.

kay, football is over. Now what? Well, pilgrim, can't you hear the slap of leather and pop of a beer can? Hell, yeah — Padres pitchers and catchers report for spring training next week!

Peoria, Arizona. It's another way of saying, "Phoenix." Think L.A. without freeways. Think hundreds of square miles populated by mini-malls and one-story cement-block houses. On its northern rim lies the Peoria Sports Complex, springtime home of the Pads

February is high season in Glob City, and the last time I was there, Glob City was full. At least the first nine motels I tried were full. Finally, way down the road, I found a Motel 6 that had one room left to let.

It wasn't until morning that I discovered I was in Sun City. According to the census bureau, 80 percent of Sun City's 38,000 residents are over 65. On the other hand, 0.4 percent are under the age of 18. But, what sticks to my mind are the golf carts. They are everywhere. Ancient men and women whip around town to doctor to hospital to cocktail lounge to Laundromat to supermarket to doctor in golf carts. A rolling golf-cart gang outfitted in Bermuda shorts and T-shirts.

This morning, while snooping the Internet for Padres spring-training news, I came across a notice that said the first Antique and Custom Golf Car Show would be held Saturday morning, February 7. The Sun Cities Area Historical Society will host. Call Ed Allen for info.

"How many golf carts in the show?"

Ed Allen says, "We have 20: 9 antique carts going back to the early '70s and 11 custom carts. The most unusual cart is an Autoette. Have you ever heard of an Autoette?"

"No."

Allen laughs, "I never had either. A gentleman called, said, 'I've got a 1960 Autoette.' It

was a little two-seater, electric people-mover designed to go to the grocery store, go to church — but not for golf — it didn't carry golf bags in the back like a traditional golf-club cart does. He's going to bring it in."

"What other kinds of golf carts do you have?"

"Let me bring that up." I hear computer keyboard clicks. "The Autoette is the oldest, then the next one would be a '72 Westinghouse. We have a Western, a '75 Harley..."

"Harley-Davidson?"

"Yeah, they were one of the early ones," Allen says. "We've got a Cushman, a Yamaha, a Taylor-Dunn... Taylor-Dunn was one of the early ones. This one is a 1980. I was hoping we'd get a three-wheeler, but the only three-wheeler we're going to have is that Autoette. As far as custom carts, we've got a 1929 Model A Ford, a 1932 Ford Hot Rod..."

"They would be fabricated to look like..."

"Yes, it probably has a plastic, fiberglass body on an E-Z-GO or golf cart," Allen says. "We've got a Cadillac, a Lincoln Continental, we've got something called Big Foot, which is where they raise the whole chassis 18 inches, like an off-road vehicle. Then we have a Jeep and a Hummer. This Hummer is a \$20,000 golf cart. It's a replica of a Hummer H3. I suppose it's bigger than the average golf cart, but it is a golf cart; he can run it on golf courses."

I want one. "How long have you lived in Sun City?"

"I'm in Sun City West. We're twin cities, three miles apart. When the developer, Del Webb, built out Sun City in '77, he opened Sun City West in '78, and then went across the street and built Sun City Grand. Opened that in '97.

"How many Sun Cities golf carts are there?"

"Well, 25 percent of the community golfs. There are 17,000 households in Sun City West, so if 25 percent of those households golf, that brings you up a number of 4000-plus. Most of those would have a golf cart. [As far as Sun City], you can almost double that number."

"I would say 35 miles per hour for a gas; 25, perhaps, for an electric."

### Number 1 El Camino pressure too much for Rancho Bernardo

After allowing 34 first-half points to Rancho
Bernardo on Wednesday night, top-ranked El

**H**ubby Patrick is revving up for a banner garden year. His cover crop is in, and now he's got a hankering for worms. "They say they're good for composting," he informed me. I hit the phones for info.

"Two pounds of red worms will eat one pound of garbage every 24 hours, assuming it is the right garbage that you are feeding them," said Daniel Rojas, owner of Red Worm

Fertilizing Products in Escondido (619-339-1963). "A family of four will produce anywhere from five to ten pounds of kitchen waste a day that can be composted. You can compost not just kitchen waste but also shredded paper, cardboard—just about anything except metal, glass, or plastic. There's

a great book by Mary Appelhof called *Worms Eat My Garbage*, which is a standard in the industry for people wanting to do this at home."

Rojas says you can purchase a worm bin or you can make your own from a rectangular plastic bin (rectangular for more surface area) with holes on the bottom for drainage. "You cover the bin with wet paper or a wet towel. Worms stay where it is moist and where there is organic matter for them to eat. Put the food in there

and cover it with the worm bedding, which is what you have to keep moist." To check the moisture level, "grab the bedding with your hand and squeeze it a little bit. If one or two drops of water come out, that is perfect. If it is too wet, just leave the bin open and it will dry

out. The worms stay on the surface. They don't like to dig down. These worms are upper feeders."

What about Patrick's compost pile?

"Be careful with the mulch," warned Rojas. "Any pile of organic matter tends to heat up. That is part of the cooking process of decomposition. Worms don't like the high temperatures. If you put them in a mulch pile and it's hot in there, they will just take off, so make sure it is not hot."

Rojas sells his worms for \$15 a pound. "There are approximately 500 to 800 worms in a pound. You get adults, immature worms, eggs, all together."

"Worms go through the compost and make it real fine and fill it full of worm castings, which is worm manure," offered Sharon "Two pounds of red worms will eat one pound of garbage every 24 hours."

of Sharon's Worm World, based in Ramona (760-419-6524). "You can use all kinds of worms, but red worms do the best. They make the compost go quicker. It might take eight months to get a compost pile ready to put in your garden. If you add worms to it,

it can be ready in 45 to 60 days. Worms will eat any dying organic matter.

will eat any dying organic matter.

Stay away from too much citrus—

it makes your worm bin too acidic. And you don't want to add any meat, dairy, or oil, which clogs up their systems. Also stay away from toxic plants like oleander, and oily plants like pine or eucalyptus....

"Worm castings are very good for eliminating whitefly," continued Sharon. "Something in the worm

casting itself changes the flavor of the plant, and some pests don't care for that flavor. It helps eliminate aphids, too....

"The worms should double in population every 60 to 90 days," added Sharon. "We sell the worms, the bedding — which is composted horse manure — and the worm castings altogether as one product for a dollar a pound. We guarantee that there are 20 worms per pound, all ages, all sizes, including worm

capsules, which are little worm eggs inside of which are four to ten baby worms."

"I have had my worm bin continuously for almost 19 years now," explained Maria Hartwell, who lives in Clairemont (858-279-7072). "My worms are very healthy, nice, juicy worms. I sell them in a threegallon bucket, in the medium in

which they have been living and growing, and it works out to be about \$14 a pound.

"In the almost 19 years that I have been doing it, I have seen an increase in the interest level. I think vermiculture is the way of the future. My husband and I barely have a small bag of garbage every week. Everything goes either to the worms, into the recycling bin, or we give it away. We generate almost no garbage at all."

Another worm-buying option: The Worms' Way (760-789-5441), located in Ramona, sells worms for \$20 a pound.

### Two strong drinks and two beers will induce a memory lapse after decades of imbibing.

He invented these particular types and is president of his own company. I offered to call him Q, as in a James Bond novel (nothing like his real initial), but he wouldn't go for it. This nameless fellow, who saves lives for a living, was one of the most genuinely humble men I have met in recent years. He did not get drunk. No one did.

our phone is ringing," David said. "It's your mom. Here." Disoriented, I took hold of the small glowing slab and mumbled, "I didn't hear anything." My iPhone buzzed in my hand. Right, I remembered, I'd silenced it last night before setting it on the nightstand beside David's pillow. The buzzing stopped. I inched closer to the clock near my head and tried to focus on the blurry green numbers: 6:13. It was Friday morning, an hour before my mother usually boreddialed me from her car on her way to work. As far as I was concerned it was still night — we'd gotten in late, and David had drawn the shades of our hotel room so we could sleep in. My phone buzzed, blinding me as the word "Mom" again appeared on the screen.

"Mom?" I croaked.

They pulled the plug on Friday, exactly one week after my earlymorning phone call from Mom.

"Barb?" She sounded frantic, but I wasn't alarmed — I'd heard that tone in her voice plenty of times. I asked her what was wrong. "It's Pop Pop," Mom said, her voice breaking. Words cascaded from her mouth, something about her father having died, that there was supposed to be a "do not resuscitate" (as decided by Mom and her

sisters a few years ago, the last time Pop Pop was at death's door) but that, when the hospital called Mom's sister for a decision. she was distraught and overwhelmed and gave them the go-ahead to revive him, which they did, prior to placing him on a ventilator, which was the only thing keeping him alive now. "And I don't know what to do," she finished.

Do Right

I let out my breath, long and slow. "If I was down there, I'd come over and give you a hug."

'Where are you?"

"I'm in L.A.," I said. "The cooking class I signed us up for? Remember I told you for David's birthday I was going to try to show an interest in his favorite hobby?" I sighed once more and sat up. "Look, it doesn't matter. What do you mean, you don't know what to do?"

Mom couldn't decide when to go back to New Jersey, or if she even wanted to. She vacillated between emotions — anger for the resuscitation, fear of judgment if she chose not to go, lament for any pain her

father might be in, and grief over his impending loss. As I listened, I felt sympathy for Mom, for her grief and the agony of her decisions. When my mother reached a stopping point, I offered her one of the truths I hold close to my heart: "There is no 'right thing to do.' There's only what's right for you. What do you want to do?"

After hours of telephonic conferences with her sisters and daughters, Mom decided she would go — but not until Tuesday. That way, she wouldn't miss her grandson's seventh birthday party on Saturday, and she'd have a few days to prepare herself.

I hardly knew my grandfather. It was only two years ago that I wrote about having forgotten he was still alive. The rest of the extended family on my mother's side — save for my Aunt Jane, who continued to reach out to me over the years — are names and faces, many of which I would have difficulty matching up. Relationships simply do not exist. This is not good or bad so much as just the way things are. How could I mourn the loss of something I didn't have? I felt for my mother. But that's where my feelings ended.

On Facebook, I noted how curious I found the concept of scheduling someone's death — the polar opposite of the Caesarean section, to appoint an hour at which life support will be withdrawn. Friends posted comments, offering their condolences. I found this interesting, considering I hadn't indicated

how I felt about it. All I'd said was that he was scheduled to die and that the concept of scheduling a life-ending appointment was strange. People assumed I was upset.

There's a protocol to life and death. When babies are born, you're supposed to congratulate the parents. You rush to the hospital to tell them their offspring is gorgeous, and if you're related or a close friend, you come bearing gifts. When someone dies, you're supposed to express sympathy to the survivors. If you can, you attend the funeral. If not, you send flowers or food along with a note that informs the grieving how sorry you are for their loss. And if you were related to the deceased, you're supposed to be among the grieving. I've never been one to abide by convention for convention's sake. I either feel it or I don't. I either want to or I won't. In this regard, I am sure I have repeatedly disappointed my family.

They pulled the plug on Friday, exactly one week after my early-morning phone call from Mom. It took half an hour for Pop Pop's heart to stop. At the wake in New Jersey, my mother was surrounded by her sisters, in-laws, cousins, nieces, and nephews. Her four daughters remained in San Diego.

The day after Pop Pop died, my sister Jane said she was thinking of sending a fruit bouquet. She asked if I was interested in doing the same. I thought about it for a moment. "I think it's a nice gesture," I said. "It's thoughtful of you to make it. But it doesn't feel right for me, so, no, I'm

and Scolari's Office in North Park and the Zombie Lounge (which Heaney has purchased) and Chaser's in City Heights. Each is being remodeled: Shooterz, at the time of this writing, is in the process of being gutted, behind a protective layer of plywood; Scolari's Office has been completely reinvented as "the Office"; the Zombie Lounge has been rechristened "the Radio Room"; and Chaser's is closed indefinitely.

The opinions on the current remodels and remodels-inprogress — have been mixed. Sebastian Ulloa, drummer for the local band Batwings, misses his old haunt, Scolari's. The night the new Office opened, he got a peek at the digs after meeting a few pals at the Pink Elephant. He wasn't thrilled.

"There were several of us, several friends I've made just from going out to the bars, and we had all discussed taking a trip over there to see what it was like," he recalls. "It was a group

of maybe ten of us that walked into the bar, looked around nobody ordered a drink — and we left immediately."

Ulloa, who used to book bands for Scolari's, says a lot of people don't want to like the new bar.

"There's an attitude that they're not going to like it before they walk in," he says. We're sitting

Daye Salani, who wrote an unfavorable review of the original Scolari's on Yelp.com, a site that allows the public to rate and discuss local businesses of all stripes, disagrees and is heavily in favor of the reinvention of the old place.

"I wasn't a fan at all of Scolari's," he says, over a coffee at Gelato Vero on India Street.

"I've been a dozen times, and every time there was some sort of drama, either a fight breaking out on the sidewalk or a crappy sound system or just drunk jerks. So when I heard that the Bar Dynamite owners were taking over the Office, I thought it was a good thing. For the most part, the one time I've been there, I enjoyed it. It was very clean; the clientele was very fun."

Other people on Yelp feel the same way,

some urging bar-goers to lighten up about the change, others echoing Salani's distaste for the atmosphere at Scolari's.

"Variety is the spice of life, and if people can't deal with it, I say just stick to what you like," says Patricia V. in her review. "Just because a place cleans up and has a bouncer doesn't mean you're suddenly in [Pacific Beach] or [downtown]. I love me [sic] dive bars and all, but it's nice to have a selection of

places to visit in one neighborhood."

"They seem to keep it classy but don't make it douchy [sic]," says Lance R. "North Park is a nicer place now, so I think it deserves a classy place like this instead of a filthy scum hole that smells like puke and butt, where homeless people/gutter punks hang out."

While the "riff-raff," as Salani describes some of the former Scolari's fans, are gone, he does recognize that the old

"One of my first deejay gigs was at Scolari's," he says. "It had its good times and its bad. I guess it just wasn't my scene. I understand why people are sad to see it go. I mean, super-cheap alcohol, who can say no to that? But, like I said

before, I'm a believer in letting things happen and giving the new place a shot and seeing if you like it."

The changes are happening, like it or not.

"Here's my theory," says Heaney, giving Club Kadan's bar-top a quick rubdown with a rag. "When the economy is good, people are buying big clubs and making big bucks. But

the economy fluctuates, and since I'm here for the long term, I like small bars with low overhead, and I think everybody else is thinking the same way, getting small bars so that they can last through tough times."



Radio Room, all his bartenders from Kadan. Before buying the club, Heaney set up a venture-capital account to which his employees contributed. Three years later, as the account reached \$40,000, Heaney began looking for a spot to purchase. He bought the bar for \$125,000.

teen years, is from Greece, bought the bar from George Scolari. Scolari owned it from the mid-'80s until 2008 and was in his 80s when he sold it in February.

Just before escrow closed in March, renovations began, which entailed a total gutting of the original interior, a tear-down of the exterior, and a full rebuilding of both.

"It needed it. Really [badly]," says Lithopoulos. "I don't like to go to a new place and not put my own signature on it. To me it's a waste of time. There was nothing there to keep, really; there was nothing. A lot of people went through there; it was a popular place. It [had] a lot of wear and tear. It was time. It was overdue, actually."

The plans for the remodel were first developed by Bells & Whistles, a University Heights design company. Then Lithopoulos's business partner and manager, Joe Balestrieri, took the reins and finished it off, their combined efforts producing the Office's current feel.

"Definitely, we wanted a city kind of look to it," says Lithopoulos. "Just basically a sexy, comfortable place."

The purchase price and the remodel, Lithopoulos says, cost him just over a million dollars.

Any trace, save for the truncated name, of the old Scolari's Office is gone. The new Office is sleek and black, everything brand new. The tiniest scent of fresh paint floats on the cool air, mixing with the scent of patrons' perfume. Black leather booths sit tucked against the left wall, each with its own candle-topped round table. A latticed divider separates the booths from the bar for about 15 feet. Beyond that is the dance floor, complete with disco ball and a new deejay area, which glows with blue LEDs. The threadbare carpet,

black-padded bar top, and low ceilings are things of the past.

There are new drinks, including a menu of "signature cocktails." The cheapest of these is a "No. 4" (Hoegaarden, Monin Lemon, 7UP, and a lemon squeeze) at \$4, and their most expensive, a "No. 7" (Grey

Goose La Poire, St. Germain, Kenwood Yulupa sparkling wine), is \$8. Beer is \$4 a pop for draft Stella Artois, Hoegaarden, Sapporo, Newcastle, and Boddingtons, while bottled beers are \$3–\$4.

The remodel — and entire purchasing process — took under three months, a time



frame that according to former bartender Richard "T-Bone" Larson put employees of the old Scolari's in an unpleasant limbo.

"We heard different things," he says. "Like, oh, he's going to fire everybody; oh, he's going to keep everything the same; oh, he's going to change it into a reggae club. As it got closer to [when] the sale was going to be final, they canceled all the shows kind of abruptly, and I still had about two months' worth of shows and touring bands from all over the world scheduled to play at Scolari's. We had to find a home for them."

After that, Larson quit, but many others stayed until a few months later, when they were let go.

"It was kind of ugly for a long time," Larson says. "They gave us all these lame reasons why they couldn't have shows anymore. 'We're being investigated by the cops, we're getting noise complaints.' All those things turned out to be false, according to what I've heard."

And they are false, says Lithopoulos. The reason for the cancellation of the bands, he claims, was simple: George Scolari didn't see the point in renewing his cabaret license — the permit that allows an establishment to have deejays and put on live shows — for the short time it would take for the sale to go through.

"The legality and reality is that it's just as simple as that,"
Lithopolous says. "[Scolari] just simply chose not to renew for a short length of time. Nothing more. The sale was

going through within 20 days anyway, so once it went through, we renovated, [and] I got the license."

The closing of Scolari's, Larson says, put a lot of people out of work, himself included. After tending bar at Scolari's for eight years, he thought he had found a new home at Chaser's in City Heights until that, too, closed in late August, after being purchased by the owners of the Bluefoot Bar in North Park.

"The only indication we had is that for about a week [the previous owner] didn't stock some of the call liquor,

so we're thinking, 'Wow, this is kind of weird,' " Larson reports. "We were out of pretty much every kind of vodka."

Eventually, the alcohol came in, but the suspicion was already there. Not long after, the bar shut down. Once again, Larson had to scramble to find venues for the bands lined up to play at Chaser's, just as he'd had to do at Scolari's.

The fate of Chaser's, Larson says, has been somewhat decided. He reports that the new owners plan to keep it a rock club and will reopen after a sixmonth remodel.

He will not, he says, reapply to work there; the experience has left a bad taste in his mouth.

"I talked to them,"

he says, speaking of the new owners. "[One] gave me his card, and he was, like, 'I know this is really hard for you guys. I know it's hard on the bands, but it's a decision we had to make.' Real businessman-speak. You know how people talk in the business world. I felt it was like a corporate takeover kind of thing.

[They were] being [really] placating, but all in all, it's about business for them."

Though he thinks the new owners will stick to their word and keep it a rock club, Larson doesn't think they're "getting off on a very good foot."

He elaborates. "Canceling all these



feel at home and stay. Now we're all hanging out in the street. So it's kind of unsafe for us."

Ulloa remarks that many other bars have changed hands over the past two years.

"Dino's used to be kind of a hip-hop bar," he says. "That's where the Pink Elephant is. Buster Daily's is now U-31. Bluefoot used to be a gay bar, a bear bar, actually. The Zombie Lounge is the Radio Room, and now with Chaser's, every dive bar that had live music has completely tried to change their image."

Daye Salani, on the other hand, embraces what's been going on in North Park, which, he says, used to be a rough area.

"There was this running joke back in the day," he says, "in the '80s, that, if there was a crime committed in North Park, the perpetrators would run back to their homes in South Park, because South Park used to be very 'hood-y' as well. You look at it now, the corner of University and 30th, it's a hotspot. You just have all these great new restaurants and bars opening up, which is good for that neighborhood. If you're a homeowner in that neighborhood, you love it because it's bringing up your property value, which is a good thing."

Nuñez says he wishes people would keep an "open mind" about the changes in the neighborhood.

"With all these new bars popping up, again, there's something for everyone," he says. "I've heard people constantly ragging on these bar owners because they're buying out their old

favorite bars, and they're kind of doing so without giving these people a chance. At the very least, they should go into the bar and check it out before they make

a decision."

Lithopoulos, too, wishes that the former patrons of Scolari's, those who have not given the new Office a fair shake, would come in and see for themselves what he has done with the place.

"I would like them to embrace it," he says. "All we did was clean up. Our prices are staying the same. We did not look the other way; we did not abandon them. We want to embrace them. They just need to open up their hearts and minds and come in and check it out. I understand they lost their Cheers.

[The Office] is the upgraded Cheers, that's all. Let it go!"

He pauses, putting his hands on the table.





I HAVE BEEN going to open houses for some time now. I do not go looking for a place to move; I rarely visit places I could ever hope to afford. Bowers happens to be acting as the agent for the people selling her childhood home on Titus Street in Mission Hills, and she notes, "I've had two people get interested in that house whose agents didn't show it to them. They told their agents they didn't want freeway noise"—the 5 sighs in the background; such is the price of the downtown/ harbor view — "but then they loved this house so much, they started thinking they could live with the freeway.

"There used to be this hideous saying in real estate: 'Buyers are liars.' It's an awful thing to say because they're not. They just don't really know what they want or what they're willing to do to compromise. They've told you one thing, and then they buy another. It's a process; they discover that they'll give up this because they want that. A good friend of mine had to have a pool, and he had to have four bedrooms and a big yard, and he would look anywhere from Point Loma/Ocean Beach to San Carlos. I kept finding things that fit the criteria, and nothing was working out. Finally, one day, his wife ended up calling me, and they bought this itty-bitty two-bedroom house in O.B. with no pool. The whole thing for her was she wanted to be near her parents, who lived in the neighborhood. She was letting him lead the way, but when it came down to it, she was the one calling the shots." So, you hold your house open in the hopes of opening a buyer's eyes to what they really, really want.

The other reason has little to do with the property in question. "Partly, realtors hold open houses not to sell the house, but to pick up new clients — other listings, buyers" for other properties. This is the reason for the ominous signin sheet that agents often shepherd you toward upon

your entrance into an open house. "The seller has requested that you sign in," says the agent, so you feel obliged — this is their home, after all. The least you can do is let them know who traipsed through. But even if the seller requests it, it's the agent who wants it.

Bowers doesn't bother with the sign-in. "I don't see the point. People can put whatever they want down there. Unless you're going to check ID, they can

say, 'I'm John Smith and I live on A Avenue.' I have found those lists to be a waste of time in terms of follow-up — if you don't connect with people at the time, get an appointment with them while they're at your

open house, you're never going to see or hear from them again."

In her early days as an agent, "They would try to train us to get names and numbers and go back to the office and immediately

call them all. We'd call them all, and nobody would be home and nobody would call us back. I have not, in 18 years, found a list of names and numbers to be of any benefit to me at all. You'll find that the people

that have been doing this the longest are the least likely to be making people sign in. It's the newbies they're doing what they've been told to do."

But while she doesn't

believe in signing in, Bow-

ers does believe in holding open houses, in part because of one big fat stars-aligning-in-the-heavens experience years ago: "I'd had this big, expensive house [A] listed for a long time. I was holding open another house listed by my office [B], because if these people could get their house sold, they were going to buy my listing. In walks this person that has to have the house I'm holding open. I list their house [C], sell this house [B], and those people buy my house [A]. The prices were like \$385, \$485, and \$725. And then I sold another house off a contact made at that open house for a halfmillion dollars."



have softened — she'll allow family pictures, but she still suggests clearing the fridge of magnets and children's masterpieces. And she will still comment if a house's decor shows a little too much...personality. "There are houses where we go into the house, and there is too much nudity — on the walls, figures, that kind of thing." Would you ever say anything? "To my clients, I would."

I sympathize. Even on my exploratory tours, I like to look at signs of life, not full-blown proclamations. I think of a judge's home office in Del Cerro, whose computer was on but asleep, his screen saver flashing one bikini babe after another. I think of a master bedroom in deepest Kensington, one of those homes right on the ridge above Mission Valley. On the wall, in enormous, giltframed glory, a Varga pinup girl lying on her back and clad in the sheerest black lace, her head thrown back in ecstasy, her impossible figure jutting out in several directions. So hard not to wonder about the point of such a display — something for the trophy wife to check herself against? "How am I holding up?" For the bored husband to glance at in an attempt to get his engine running? A demarcation of the bedroom as erotic space? "Here be sex" instead of the ancient maps' "Here be dragons."

But better (worse) still than the Varga girl was the upstairs master bedroom in Rolando where my wife and I (and many others) discovered a series of professional portraits of the lady of the house when she was a blushing bride. Except she wasn't blushing — we would have been able to tell if she was. The portraits captured only her, except for her billowy veil. None of the portraits was explicit, but they were certainly suggestive — the bride, seated on the floor, looking back over her veiled shoulder with a smile. The effect was not the anonymous, mysterious (who are these people?) sexuality denoted by the Varga; this was My Personalized Sexy Space. Hard to imagine taking up one's own love life in such a room.

After I bought my second house, I stopped going to open houses for a long while. There was no point, I told myself, and my Sunday afternoons were better spent elsewhere. But after a year or two, I started stopping here and there one at a time, just for fun, mind you — especially in Mission Hills, long my favorite neighborhood and also the site of Mission Hills Nursery, where my wife likes to shop. Gradually, I got the bug again, and now, here I am, a full "Sunday, 1–4 p.m." in front of me, heading down Washington to see what there is to see.



gentle in letting me know that it was well out of my price range; he mainly stressed the importance of getting prequalified with a lender so as to "get an idea of what I could afford.") Bowers said that anything under 900K tended to fly off the page in Mission Hills, but this is Mission Hills below Washington, so perhaps things aren't moving quite as fast here. After three months or so on the market, the house is down almost 50 grand from its original list price — \$849,500 instead of \$899,000. At 2959 square feet (out of a 4539-squarefoot lot) the flyer boasts that the house costs a mere "\$287 per square foot!"


The two-story 1913 Craftsman leads with charm, charm, charm white picket fence, blooming front yard, brick driveway, those lovely old Mission-style window frames. Inside is more charm oh, that porte cochere, those fir floors showing their ancient nailheads, those French doors between living and dining rooms! Those alcoves off the front bedrooms, lit by sunlight pouring through fascinating trapezoidal windows! Those period Arts-and-Crafts light fixtures! The old pleasure in fine old houses warms anew.

But the period chandelier in the dining room hints at what the kitchen confirms: this is not simply an older house, not even an "updated" older house. This is a total remodel, the kind that is bought to be fixed up and sold. There is a uniformity to the color and decor that says that great swaths of work were done at the same time — no piecemeal upgrades here.

Naturally, amendments have been made for the modern taste. The kitchen has been allowed to maintain its antiquated tininess (10′ x 11′) but has been stuffed with a checklist of

amenities: granite counters, maple cabinets, stainless-steel appliances, and Travertine floors. The house was originally a 4/4 with what counted as a spacious back yard by city-home standards. But there was no family room for children, toys, and media/ entertainment centers; and no gigantic (14'x 20' as opposed to 14'x 13') master bedroom with accompanying bath and walk-in closet. Two of the upstairs bedrooms had their own baths, but neither was large enough for the near-mandatory "oversize Jacuzzi tub and oversize shower," outfitted with not-so-mandatory "double waterfall showerheads." So the owner built back into the yard, creating two tasteful, fairly well integrated (wood floors, stone — Travertine! — fireplaces, more period light fixtures) rooms and leaving a cozy-shady square of back yard around an enormous alder. 

back yard, a "refinished" garage: drywalled, painted, brick-floored, with yet another period light hanging down from the rafters.

It is pleasant enough to

row-slat shutters made from the same wood as the window frames. Built-in glassfronted bookcases. Builtin hutch in the dining room, wainscoting up to my neck, a built-in settee under the window.

The kitchen has been remodeled, but it was a while ago; the roostersand-pears country French wallpaper makes me think of the '80s somehow. A wood-topped island has a functional but not commercial air — no stainless steel in sight. I like the pullout cutting boards very much — they're the real deal, nice and thick and heavy and solid, the sort on which you could actually chop a chicken.

Back beyond the original house, back into the newish "hump," the color scheme shifts from woods and yellows to white walls, ice-blue trim and sky-blue carpeting. Up front is the showplace, back here is where people live. There are pictures of children, and pictures by children, lace curtains instead of shutters, the home office, the family room with the big-screen TV. Though more solid than many newer homes, the addition feels a touch worn. One bathroom dates from just before the ascendance of wall-to-wall earth tones: pink and beige, a herald of things to come.

Up the stairs is a master suite with a similar justyesterday feel: huge enough bedroom, but a bathroom in which everything is rectangles and squares — none of the diagonals so common today. The toilet has its own little room, and the Jacuzzi tub is appropriately gargantuan, but the pale blue grout between the white tiles pulls the space back in time. A TV, VCR, and boom box sit on a desk facing the bed — no media center here. The most interesting thing is the poster hanging in the stairway: Bosch's Garden of Earthly Delights, surely the most eclectic display of nudity one could use to decorate a bedroom. That great festival of revealed flesh, flanked by the sparse bliss of heaven and the torturous horrors of hell...



truly awesome in terms of high-quality — the man spent a lot of money. The floor is stained oak; the doors are Douglas fir. This is probably a \$130,000 to \$150,000 kitchen."

The kitchen is magazine-ad worthy — Gaggenau stovetop, stainless steel counters above broad, steelfronted German drawers that roll out with a whisper. The fridge is covered by a laminate that matches the deep red-brown of the cabinets (and the doors throughout the house). "It really looks like another cabinet; it freaks people out." Though there is uniformity here, the place is not so anonymous as Goldfinch; it bears a designer's stamp. All casings are a pewter-gray/black, contrasting sharply with both the stark white of the walls and the warm brown of the doors. The kitchen is only the most obvious expression of the house's hard-edged leanness, a quality that contrasts with the rambling "Oh, another room over here" layout.

The stamp is there in the all-important master bath as well — gray stone for the entrance to the cavernous shower, a Jacuzzi ringed by a hundred tiny jets instead of eight big ones but the agent tells me the master suite has been some-

long row of French doors. "There's 80 of these doors and windows," says the agent. "They're all from Canada. They're a Douglas-fir frame and then coated with some kind of rubberized film on the outside. They're all double-pane."

Besides the doors, what you notice is the airiness of the 31' x 23' living room, which segues invisibly into the 16'x 12' dining room the ceiling is vaulted and was built with steel so that no cross beams were necessary. The lower third of the C is formed by a kitchen/ family room that has been built out over what used to be a garage-top deck. Here, the decor is slightly more expected than the Spanish house — lots of pale stone, marble countertops, etc. Expensive, but not unique.

The bedrooms curl around the top of the C; the master suite is reached via a curving staircase. "There used to be a deck up there. The house was built for an older lady - she used the downstairs master bedroom. There was just a little bedroom and bath up there for her kids when they visited." A Rancho Santa Fe team — two brothers, one an architect, one a contractor — was brought in to improve the property. Now, all that remains of the homely old upstairs is the banged-up hollow-laminate bedroom door with its forlorn handle. The bathroom was expanded, the deck became the master bedroom, and the bedroom became the walk-in closet.

There's a selling point: a closet the size of some people's bedrooms. Because there is so much spotless luxury about, the eye is drawn to things that are not neatly stacked, not carefully arranged, not comfortably appointed. There is a leather-clad repository for glasses, wallet, watch, etc., but next to it, a La Victoria salsa jar for spare change. There are Nordstrom shoe trees in all the shoes on the shelves, but the sneakers are piled on the floor. There are plastic bags full of stuff. Bras are piled on a shelf, handbags on the shelf above. The women's shoes are stored in their original, faded boxes — Salvatore Ferragamo, Peter Kaiser, Bruno Magli, Cole Haan, Nine West, Nichols. The boxes are carefully labeled with marker: black patent flats, rubber sole black pump, green suede flats, green flat sandals, taupe sandals.

I am stuffed, heavy with real estate. I need something light, refreshing, a sorbet after the beef course. A two-bedroom bungalow near a park, down to \$599,000 from \$629,000. Compact living spaces, lots of old windows looking out on a canyon, the comfort of lively jazz —

music to sell houses by. Still Mission Hills, but Mission Hills with the old Dishmaster faucet jutting from the wall in the kitchen. There is a deck with a spa overlooking the canyon and a tire-swing hanging from a tree at the base of the property. A little girl walks up the hill with her mother, who tells her, "No, honey, there's no room to put in a pool."







esteryear, Old Camp was a popular rendezvous point for hunting parties using the historic Joplin Trail between the flatlands of Orange County's Trabuco Canyon and Old Saddleback (the crest of the Santa Ana Mountains). Today, Old Camp retains its charm as a remote hideaway, filled with massive live oaks, bay laurels, and bigleaf maples, serenaded by bubbling water flowing in the bottom of Santi-

ago Canyon.

Today, Old Camp is reached by way of the Santiago Trail, a fire road closed to motor vehicles. Sticking close to the original Joplin route over part of its length, it runs for about seven miles along the sunny ridgeline just south of Santiago Canvon. finally dropping abruptly into the canvon. For more than a year after Orange County's October 2007 Santiago wildfire, Santiago Trail was closed to all use, but it has recently reopened for hikers and mountain bikers. Users are advised to stick to Inside Santiago Canvon the trail itself; off-trail

travel is not allowed until November 2009 at the earliest, in order to allow the natural landscape to recover from the effects of the fire. The trailhead is along

Modieska Grade Road at a point 0.5 mile north of Santiago Canvon Road in southeastern Orange County. Modjeska Grade Road tops a saddle, and the Santiago Trail, starting at a sturdy steel, vehicle-blocking gate, strikes off to the east. There's no parking right near the gate, but you can find a few eligible areas. delineated between signed "no parking" zones, on the soft shoulder of Modjeska Grade Road


On foot or by bike, head east on the Santiago Trail, and in a mile enter Cleveland National Forest. At 2.8 miles, you begin skirting the back side of the Vulture Crags. These broken outcrops of conglomerate rock served as a nesting site for California condors over a hundred years ago. On a little farther, you can look back and note, below the crags, laver upon laver of beige to brick-red marine sediments, all spectacularly tilted as a result of faulting associated with the formation of the Santa Ana Mountains.

After a long and somewhat tedious 7.2 miles on the Santiago Trail, the trail forks. A short spur continues upward to follow a small powerline, while the Santiago Trail bears left and descends to Old Camp (7.5 miles). A narrow, rugged remnant of the Joplin Trail continues uphill from there and all the way to the saddle between the two peaks of "Old Saddleback" - Santiago and Modieska peaks. which together form the crown of the Santa Ana Mountains, Old Camp, however, is probably as far as you'll want to travel in a single day, so head back the way you came.

#### OUTDOORS

The Frost-Nipped Legacies of the holiday season's cold spells should not be hard to spot, especially in the inland areas where overnight lows dipped to below freezing. Look for brown lawns, half-dead-looking avocado trees, and wilted ornamental plants like poinsettias. One common frostsensitive native plant, the laurel sumac, is responsive to the reach of cold air. Laurel sumac is often the largest and most conspicuous plant growing within the coastal sage-scrub type of vegetation native to San Diego's undisturbed canyon hillsides. Wherever freezing-cold air has sunk into low lying canyons and basins, laurel sumac bushes tell the story by appearing brown and withered a few weeks

Ornamental Pear Trees are bursting into bloom all over town. The thousands of white blossoms appear in sheets and clusters, rather like snow when viewed from a distance. Nice specimens can be seen along Lake Murray Boulevard, along Clairemont Mesa Boulevard between Highway 163 and Interstate 15, and in parts of downtown San Diego.



February's Full Moon, on Monday the 9th, rises impressively from the deeply darkened east horizon at around 6:00 p.m., about 40 minutes after the time of sunset. Watch as its bubble-like, golden-hued disk launches itself over San Diego's mountainous eastern skyline. The following morning, you can watch the moon fade in dawn's glare while sinking into the Pacific. When seen near the horizon, the moon often seems to be larger than life. The effect, called the "moon illusion," is purely psychological.





"What do vou do when you get anxious for a role, Paul?" asked Stencil.

"I drink heavily," replied Giamatti.

"Well, how you doing now?"

More Radio Ga-Ga After four years as KGB's afternoon deejay, Ditch was fired on January 20.

"The entire building was on lockdown that day. You couldn't even walk into the lobby. You had to get buzzed in. What is the purpose of that? Do they think someone who was fired is going to walk back in with a gun?"

Ditch says he and everyone else who worked at Clear Channel's seven-station San

Diego group knew that January 20 was going to be "bloodbath day." Clear Channel fired 1850 employees nationwide and a report-

ed 57 in San Diego stations. "I got a call that morning

at 10:30. They said, 'It's layoff day. I'm sorry, you're on the list. Be here at 12:30.' I was escorted into the studio to get my headphones. Then I was escorted out.... For a week before it happened, Bobbie Hill [another KGB DJ who lost his job] said the atmosphere there was like going to a wake but without a dead body and without the booze."

But radio, Ditch says, is a "gypsy business," often requiring relocation. "When you have kids, packing up and moving is not an appealing option. I have a two-yearold and a seven-year-old in second grade. I don't know what I'm going to do. I have done the concert-promotion thing. I might want to get into some things on the side."

Ditch doesn't think radio

is dead. "But the ones left standing will be those who program and promote locally. Listeners are not stupid. They know which stations are live and engage them with local topics. Those are the stations that gradually rise to the top. I was massively into putting callers on the air." Ditch says he fears that corporate radio chains will continue to use nonlocal, syndicated shows as Clear Channel does with Ryan Seacrest on Star 94.1. "When you try and program a show from Los Angeles or Phoenix, you are losing a guy in San Diego who is talking to San Diego about what San Diego is doing."

**Makes Cents** After publicly feuding with their former lead singer, the Taz Taylor Band has replaced vocalist Graham Bonnet (Rainbow, Michael Schenker Group) with another MSG vet, Keith Slack.

U.K. guitarist Neil Taz Taylor moved to San Diego in 1997 and teamed up with Graham Bonnet when he found the fellow Brit rocker living nearby. After working together on the Taz Taylor Band's 2008 album Welcome to America, a Russian tour was booked, but the singer quit before departure.

"The reason for the cancellation," according to

Bonnet on his website, was "we'd recently performed in Europe and the fees I'd negotiated and expected were not honored. I lost money on the tour, as my modest outgoings were far greater than my final paycheck.... I don't know of anyone who would work for free or, even more bizarrely, pay to work."

Taylor responded that "There were no fees ever negotiated by Graham for the recent European tour that he refers to. Graham knew and agreed to participate in the tour for whatever the revenues were, based on ticket sales.... At the end of the tour, Graham and a hired keyboardist received every cent of the revenue, including

all the money from our own merchandise sales."

"Only hours after flights were paid, Graham changed his mind about performing the [Russian] shows, stating

ike Keneally was fronting local band Drop Control when the invitation came in 1987 to join Frank Zappa's touring band as a "stunt guitarist," replacing Steve Vai.

"The multivolume work I'm doing now. Scambot, shows a lot of Frank's influence," says Keneally. "Frank's presence has been exerting itself in my life a lot lately...I've

been listening to his music in the car for several

Keneally has released nine albums of original music since 1992 and has shared the stage with Screamin' Jay Hawkins, Robert Fripp, Negativland, Wayne Kramer, Solomon Burke, Sting, the Persuasions, and the Loud Family.

"I play so much, I'm always finding stuff I forgot at RadioKeneally.com," he admits. "Like unreleased songs from my live shows which I've only heard once and then forgotten about. Any one of our shows is distinct from any other, so listening reminds me of onstage happenings which otherwise would have slipped my mind, like spontaneous Monkees covers or microtonal broken-string guitar solos and improvisations."

Keneally's new rarities album Wine and Pickles is a collection of obscure studio tracks from 1998 to 2006. His newly formed trio Keneally Minnemann Beller is fresh off a January 16 performance at the NAMM show (National Association of Music Merchants), and a songwriting collaboration is in the works with XTC's Andy Partridge.

"I seem to be getting more fired up and productive as time goes on."

### IS IT DIFFICULT TO DESCRIBE YOUR MUSIC?

"It's essentially rock, with equal emphasis on improvisation and strictly composed things. There's a lot of guitar in it. I'm mainly known as a guitarist, although keyboard was my first instrument, and I play a lot of different instruments on my recordings. Dynamically, melodically, rhythmically, and

> lyrically, it's real diverse and eclectic. I love a lot of different musical styles, and it all gets mashed in."

### WHAT'S IN YOUR CD PLAYER?

1. Frank Zappa, You Can't Do That on Stage Anymore, Volume One. "There's a 20-minute live version of 'Don't Eat the Yellow Snow' on there that is so good, it makes my eyes leak. It's joyous and stunning."

2. Wendy Carlos, Switched-On Box Set. "Four discs of Carlos's Moog synthesizer orchestrations of Bach music. Switched-On Bach had a huge impact on me when I was eight years old. I had never before heard anything that sounded so colorful."

- 3. Pavement, Brighten the Corners. "The new twodisc deluxe editions of Pavement's catalogue are all wicked cool."
- 4. Rufus Wainwright, Want One. "It's his best bunch of songs. I'm glad there are still artists who care about really writing songs and know how to
- 5. The Flying Luttenbachers, Systems Emerge from Complete Disorder. "Complex postapocalyptic craziness by a multi-instrumentalist named Weasel Walter. I worked with him and Henry Kaiser on an Albert Ayler tribute album a couple of years ago, and it was exhilarating playing with Weasel on the drums. He's a total genius-freak."

### **MUST-HAVE DVDs?**

1. Mr. Show, The Complete Series. "Mid-'90s HBO sketch-comedy series with a lot of collective comic brilliance captured at just the right time. Entertaining commentary tracks, too."

2. The Mighty Boosh. "Andy Partridge from XTC just introduced me to this peculiar and entertaining British comedy series. Since being poisoned by Monty Python and Firesign Theatre as a teenager, I've had a strong love for quality absurdist humor."

3. A Hard Day's Night. "I remember reading a Mike Myers interview where he talks about seeing this movie as a kid and crying at the end when the Beatles fly away in the helicopter. I understood perfectly. I'm still in love with the idea of the Beatles as it was presented in this

movie and with the fantasy of life-in-a-band that it painted. It's nostalgia, but at the same time beautiful filmmaking, which is just enchanting to me."

4. 2001: A Space Odyssey. "It hypnotized me in the movie theater when I was seven years old, and I'm still under the trance."

5. "The fifth DVD would probably be something from Miles Davis, Bob Dylan, or John Coltrane. I can't choose between them. But maybe it's a late-'60s German TV musical called Help, Help, the Globolinks! For real. Look it up."



As a pop culture observer, I hate to hang a performer's career image on a single recording about roadkill and for the sheer gusto with which he sang it, but so be it. In 1974, when **Loudon** Wainwright III put out "Dead Skunk," a lot of people thought it was about then-president Richard M. Nixon. It wasn't. Wainwright said the song was about roadkill and that it came to him in less than 15 minutes. "Dead Skunk" placed him in the mix as a wry and satirical re-

When Wainwright emerged with acoustic guitar on the folk stages of the 1960s, the rock press called him the next Dylan. "They were lookin' for you, signin' up others," he sang in protest in his "Talking New Bob Dylan." "We

were new Bob Dylans/ Your dumb-ass kid brothers." In the song, one gains a sense of Wainwright's deeper inner-Dylan frustration: "Well, we still get together every week at Bruce's [Springsteen's] house/ Why, he's got quite a spread, I tell ya — it's a 12-step program."

Wainwright was married to folk artist Kate McGarrigle for a time, and together they produced a small and popular singer-songwriter dynasty in their offspring Rufus and Martha Wainwright. Predictably, a more private side of Wainwright senior emerged from the lyrics of

his children's songs. "I'm gonna break you down," sang the enigmatic Rufus, "And see what you're really worth to me." But Martha went for the grand slam when she wrote "Bloody Mother F\*\*\*ing A\*\*hole," a song she publicly admitted was Loudon-inspired.

Wainwright's reply? Sober diplomacy: "Pain is a good subject matter," he told a re-



porter. "There's pain and conflict in family life, and that's what drama is. You can be John Denver and talk about how beautiful the mountains are, and that works if you're John

ast December 8 would've been Jim Morrison's 60th birthday. Two of the surviving Doors threw a party in Hollywood at Barney's Beanery, famous in the '60s for the stars who hung out there.

I wasn't invited to the Morrison birthday bash, but I decided to drive up and crash it. On my way, I was talking to a friend on the phone. I pulled over on the 805 as cops and fire engines zoomed by with lights on and sirens blaring. My friend said, "Are you getting a ticket for talking while you drive?"

A minute later I drove by smoke and fire to my left. My friend said, "That's probably where that jet just crashed into a house. I just heard that on the news."

I got to Barney's a few hours early. I knew that L.A. radio station KLOS was letting in only a handful of listeners, so I was happy I talked to the right people and was told they'd let me in. Then I walked down the street to grab a bite.

I sat down in a Greek restaurant and began reading the *L.A.*Times. A guy on his way out the door said, "I like your shirt!" It was an L.A. Woman tee. I didn't look up from the paper but said, "Thanks." The guy then put his

finger on my chest and said, "I especially like that guy there." I looked down and saw he was pointing at Ray Manzarek, the Doors' keyboard player. When I looked up, I saw it was Manzarek himself. I laughed, and we talked for a few minutes.

When he left, a big group at

another table said, "Is that guy famous?" I explained who he was, and a woman with a French accent said, "I love the Doors!" She sprinted out and talked to him on the street corner for five minutes. When she returned, she texted everyone on her phone and asked

me six times how to spell his last name.

Back at Barney's, there was a crowd of autograph seekers. I saw Henry Diltz, who took the Doors' photo for their *Morrison Hotel* album and has a gallery in La Jolla by the same name. We chatted for a few minutes.

I went inside and started talking with a woman named Melissa who works for Rhino Records. I talked about compilation CDs they've released that I like. For a woman in her mid-20s, she knew a lot about the history of rock.

We watched some people bring in a huge cake with psychedelic-colored frosting. I said, "It should've been shaped like a microphone or a record album. That thing is just some huge square thing. Although...it's probably the size of Jim's coffin."

Someone heard this and said, "That's messed up, man." After Melissa started telling me a story, a guy came over and said, "Come on, let's go."

She paused, looked at me, and apologized. She explained, "I'm just starved, and we supposedly get free food, but I have to go with my group now." I said, "Hey...for free food, I'd stop talking to me, too."

While I talked briefly with the owner of Barney's, I heard a crowd of 100 screaming fans outside. I looked out the window and saw Doors guitarist Robby Krieger walking up with Manzarek. Manzarek saw me and said, "Hey, it's you again! How was your dinner?"

Krieger did an interview with a TV station, and then I spoke with him. I asked about some rare Doors songs, including "Spanish Caravan," which had a flamencoguitar intro. He said, "Yeah, that intro never got saved. But I'm reworking that for a new CD."

After we were done talking, I heard Krieger tell deejay Jim Ladd a story about being in Barney's when Morrison threw a pool ball at him. It missed and shattered a

KLOS started to broadcast live, and I sat down at the only table left. I felt guilty about all the fans standing outside in the cold.

If I call her right now, could you give her crap? Tell her she should get a life and stop sitting around watching what you do in your life." He smiled and said,

After an hour of the broadcast, I figured I'd head back to San Diego. I told the women what the bouncer told me about not needing to tip the waitress.


I told them I wanted to leave a tip but was completely broke. I asked, "Can you cover it?" They pulled out a 20-dollar bill and said we were good.

# **Some Enchanted Evening**

Valentine's Day is the year's biggest night for restaurants. Who doesn't love love? For some it's proposal night; for others, a renewal of vows. Or snuggle-up time. Or hoping-to-get-lucky night. The chefs await you with the most sensual menus of the year. Here's a selection of romantic restaurants at a wide price range to make your evening enchanted.

Of course, you don't necessarily have to go out. A personal favorite private celebration: two dozen chilled, super-fresh raw oysters from Blue Waters on India Street, to be eaten on the halfshell with a little Nawlins-style oyster sauce (bottled chili sauce, horseradish, lemon juice, Tabasco, a touch of Worcestershire if desired. carefully blended to taste). I don't know whether oysters are really aphrodisiacs, but if you love 'em, well, yeah, they work. (Note: Amateur shuckers should wear a heavy glove or mitt on the oyster-holding hand, because if the oyster knife slips, there will be blood — yours.) Another wildly erotic oyster dish is available at the better sushi bars: "Honeymoon Oysters" (raw oyster, quail egg, tobiko, etc.). Whoo! I've tasted outstanding versions at the sushi bar at the Fish Market (of all places!), Tomiko's in Encinitas, and Nobu in Solana Beach. Add a couple of uni *nigiri* and you're on your way — to a sexy dinner.

You may have noticed the paper is a little smaller these days (hence, fewer words), so the listings below include only the neighborhoods and telephone numbers. # **Very Thai**

### "I don't know how, but it works. I think the water optics confuse them."

'm confused. Here I am, top of India Street, breezy Friday, trying to decide between Mexican and Thai. El Indio and Saffron. Each one's a sort of record-holder. El Indio's

one of the oldest taco places in town — they actually invented the taquito — and Saffron was the first Thai place in town.

Seems like an eon since I tried either. Thing I remember is, they're both generous, El Indio and Saffron. But what

sways me is, well, Isan. Aah, yes. The smell of Saffron's Isan-style grilled chicken floods out. 'Course that only happens in their original shop, a little ol' green-red-brown place at 3731 India. The newer addition next door, at 3737, is all about noodles and saté.

But you can't beat the taste of chicken as the spice-loving Isan people cook it up in Thailand's northeast. It's enough to get any gastrofreak's juices flowing.

The thing about old Saffron's storefront is it looks kinda distinguished. It sits right next to stone steps that climb up a set of terraces lined with cream-colored concrete balustrades, tables, and one metal umbrella. Shakespeare's Pub sits at the top. Yes, I do think about going along to the more sophisticated Saffron shop for maybe a curry or a fat-noodle *sen-yai*. The menu's completely different there, and the decor is modern. But what the heck, I whip in to this cozier little chicken counter instead. Take-out only. It's bulging with customers. A dozen rotisserie chickens grill golden on a five-

rack vertical rolling spit.

Hmm...I see the door menu lists a bunch of chicken combinations, "served with jasmine rice, Cambodian salad, and a choice of sauce."

It ranges from two legs and one sauce (\$4.87) to a whole chicken and five sauces, for around \$15. Three guys, all in red T-shirts, slave away around the chickens, mounting new birds for broiling, chopping up the cooked ones. They tell me the Issan fla-

vor comes from marinating the chicken overnight in garlic, ginger, chiles, and white pepper. I go for the two legs and one sauce, and while they're cookin', I make a dash up to the corner for a coffee from Gelato Vero Caffe (\$1.40). I come back right on time, haul my little polystyrene box up the Shakespeare stairway next door, and sit down at a table under the lone umbrella. I open up, and maybe it's that garlic-ginger combo they marinate the bird in, because this chick is hot and luscious. But gently luscious. No violent chile burns here. I do taste the ginger coming through, but not in a mean way. What's more, I chose the peanut sauce (I could have had Sriracha, sweet pepper, salsa, chutney, or egg-roll sauce), and dipping the legs in that is great. Plus, hey! They threw in a wing, too, on top of the jasmine rice and Cambodian salad.

'Course, I'm wondering what's so Cambodian about the Cambodian salad. It's, what? Shredded lettuce, carrots, with peanut crumbs on top? Then I taste, and I know it's

genuine...fish sauce. *Nam pla*. Fish sauce in the salad! Turns out they put garlic, chiles, lime juice, and cilantro in as well. So that's a little plastic bowl of pleasure, and all in all, what with munching through two legs and a big fat wing, as well as the rice, it's a lot of food, and tasty all the way. And a pleasure to chow into up here on the terrace, looking out toward the coast (though all you see is the I-5 freeway) and all for a total of five greenbacks.

I finish up and then decide to get something for Carla, but from the noodle side of the restaurant. Huh. On the way into the cool, artstrewn main eatery, I pass a bunch of photos showing the owner, Su Mei Yu, with Julia Child, Jimmy Carter, Charlie Gibson, Diane Keaton...Wow. This lady is popular.

And I'm impressed with the fact that she's selling reusable plastic containers for takeouts ("Keep them in your car!") and even offering 10 percent off if you bring your own cutlery and plates and bowls.

Gal named Willi is eating a green curry (\$7.60). Ooh. Carla might like that. I ask her about it. "I've just spent two years in southern Thailand," she says, "and this is the real thing."

The other "real" thing is the water-filled plastic bags dangling from the ceiling. "To keep flies out," says Willi. "I don't know how, but it works. I think the water optics confuse them. That's very Thai, too."

Oh, man. Ain't that the truth. Actually, it

really does feel like a little slice of Thailand in here. Nothing fancy. Not the usual Buddha and elephants on the walls. Just something about the smells and the overall atmosphere. I steal a taste of Carla's curry before they box it up. It's all in there. The basil, the lemongrass, that galangal, Thai ginger, and the coconut milk. Maybe I should take one of the water-filled bags, to dangle, just to bring the atmosphere home.

### BEACHES

Azul La Jolla 1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-9616. The flagship of the local Brigantine chain serves ambitious Japanese-influenced, California-global fusion cuisine on a daily changing menu in a room with a panoramic ocean view. But you need not stuff your shirt to dine here — garb runs to resort-casual and the atmosphere is family friendly. There's even a low-priced kiddie menu. The wine list is friendly, too, with merciful markups and plenty by the glass and half-bottle. Full bar. Short staircase down to restaurant; elevator to the right of en-try (ask for directions for wheelchair access when calling to reserve). Valet parking. Very noisy. One vegetarian entrée,

but all food restrictions accommodated to order. Lunch Tuesday through Saturday, dinner nightly, Sunday brunch. Very expensive. — N.W.

Bully's La Jolla 5755 La Jolla Boule vard, La Jolla, 858-459-2768. Despite the plasma TV sports screen, this place is '60s. For example, dark, woody, plush red booths. And always crowded Word is, they serve more prime rib with au jus and horseradish than any eatery in San Diego. The Petite Cut 8 ounce, their smallest, fills you plenty, with its baked potato and salad. But just once, come here with your main squeeze and order up the "full cut for two." It does a hangten over the edges. Or go bonkers and order the 32-ounce cut (available in Mission Valley) - just to watch your neighbors' eyes bug out. Not flush? Try the Bully Burger, French Dip sandwich, or calamari sandwich. Lonely? Go to the horseshoe-shaped Low Bar. Lunch and dinner daily. — E.B.

Kabuki Sushi Restaurant 4475 Mission Boulevard, Pacific Beach, 858-270-1986. This place has a unique system of delivering tempting dishes to you via boats floating along a mini-canal that surrounds the sushi bar. You take food off and pay according to the plate size. The sushi chefs — they can be a show in themselves — have the usual panoply of sushi, sashimi, nigiri. The dragon rolls (crab, shrimp tempura, eel, avocado) and spider roll (soft-shelled crab) are tasty too. It's young and crowded here — is that because you don't have to sweat the menu, just grab what you like off the boat and chew? Open for lunch and dinner Tuesday to Saturday; dinner only Sunday; closed Monday. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

Karinva Thai 4475 Mission Boulevard. Pacific Beach, 858-270-5050. Think of the movie The Beach, with a bunch of Leo DiCaprio look-alikes getting off on the coconut curries like gang ped, panang and kang kari. Or noodle dishes like the famous pad thai. But they're in the right place: Karinya remains true to its Thai

origins. The tom yum kung (hot and sour shrimp soup) is a meal in itself. Steaming away with its fierce little charcoal fire at your table, the hot pot holds plenty of shrimp, and you can taste the essential mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, lime juice, cilantro, and of course *nam pla*, Thai fish sauce. A nice counterpart to the hots of the soup are the Fresh Spring Rolls, filled with tofu and vegetables and mint. Another sizzler: *pad talay*, a sauté pan full of mussels, shrimp, squid, and other seafood in a great spicy sauce. The recipe's from Koh Samed, an island like the one featured in The Beach. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

La Jolla Brew House 7536 Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-6279. Don't expect to see the beach. Do expect to taste ome good beers made right here and good solid food, such as the prime rib sandwich (which goes great with their Russian Stout) or the roasted potato. Or maybe best of all, the buffalo burger big, hefty, and low on cholesterol. You'd call this a family, multigenerational sports bar eatery. Nice mix. It's La Jolla, so it's not dirt cheap, but the guys here seem really interested in making interesting brews and good food to accompany them. Open for dinner seven days; lunch Tuesday through Sunday. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* 

Mardi Gras Café 3185 Midway Drive. Point Loma, 619-223-5501. The Creole cooking at this café/grocery, to eat in, take out, or have catered for your next party, is sound and tasty, if deliberately underseasoned (just add salt and hot sauce to taste). You can also buy the real and rare ingredients from the freezer, deli case, and grocery shelves, including Cajun tasso (spiced ham), boudin blanc (rice sausage), and crawfish sausage when it's in season. Daily brunch through early dinner. No alcohol, everything available for takeout. Inexpensive. — *N.W.* 

Michele Coulon Pastries 7556-D Fay Avenue, La Jolla, 858-456-5098. The daughter of Don Coulon (retired chefowner of the Belgian Lion restaurant)

presides at this delightful little café/bakery. (Look for it behind the octagonal sandwich shop that fronts its mini-mall.) Every ingredient is fresh and of top quality. Cakes are light, moist, rich, and available as wholes, slices, and even "miniatures," plus you can choose tarts, chocolates, ice creams, and breakfast pastries. Open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Moderate. — N.W.

The Pannikin La Jolla 7467 Girard Avenue, La Jolla, 858-454-5453. Also in Del Mar and in Encinitas. Oh, sure, the inside of this converted bungalow is cool, with its woody-green tables of different heights and cool damsels with animal temp-tattoos on their arms serving you. But here at Pannikin's La Jolla outpost, the outside's the "in" spot, with its brick and earth tones and weathered timber and sixties rainbow tables. But you have to make it through the laptop-clacking, cell phone-blabbing crowd who use this as their garden office and Very Important Meeting spot. Musicians, grad students, and school kids also show up to munch twigs and nuts and think serious thoughts. Breakfasts are mostly steamed-egg variations, including the popular Greek eggs and a filling breakfast burrito. For lunch, a mild chicken curry is a nutty treat, and "pannwiches" such as ham or tuna are fresh, generous, and worthy, though the retros among us will be looking for a salt lick all the way home. La Jolla and Del Mar three meals daily, Encinitas breakfast and lunch only. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Saska's & Saska's Sushi 3768 Mission Boulevard, Mission Beach, 858-488-7311. Venerable, local steak-and-seafood ioint that tries harder, from the broththin homemade teriyaki sauce (sweet up front, fading to bitter ginger) for the well-cooked (if mild-flavored) fish to the cuton-the-premises aged beef. The interior's low wood-slat ceilings, driftwood beams, dim light, and red leather booths combine with the stay-up-late kitchen to make the space feel like a cozy haven, a respite from the brighter buzz of Mis-

sion Beach. The wine list runs the gamut from Cook's sparkling wine to Cristal champagne, stopping along the way at an interesting (if expensive) collection of reserves. Next door is the restaurant's serviceable sushi bar (858-488-7255) and two-story patio dining. Lunch weekdays, brunch and lunch weekends; dinner seven days. Sushi bar open nightly, 5:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. Moderate. — *A.M.* 

Sportsmen's Seafoods 1617 Quivira Road, Mission Beach, 619-224-3551. Fifty years ago this restaurant-fish market was a tuna cannery, part of San Diego's late-lamented fishing industry. same Sicilian family still owns it, and still knows everything about fish and how to cook it. The menu is devoted to the "fruits of the sea" and includes a wonderful seafood platter (shrimp, squid, clams, fish, fries, and salad). And, of course, a crispy-crunchy fish-and-chips platter. Eat outside on deck, contemplating the small ships on the bay. They buy seasonal catch from local fishboats and also sell it at their attached retail market. They're famous for smoking fish for the fishermen. Open daily, lunch/early dinner. Retail market closed Monday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

### BAJA

From the United States use the prefix 011-52 when calling Mexico.

Big Boy Restaurant 9892 Agua Caliente Boulevard, Baia, 664-686-3788. Besides having excellent Mexican-American food, this Big Boy knock-off draws some of the most interesting people in Tijuana — journalists, lawyers, cattle ranchers, politicians, Baja's heavy hitters. Day or night, Big Boy is always busy. Gringo food's no problem. Breakfast includes eggs, bacon, sausage, chorizo or ham, plus hash browns or frijoles, toast, juice, and endless coffee. Nobody will object if you sit sipping the free refills till the moon comes up. But you won't —

you'll crack and order more when you smell the popular, macho "royal" hamburger, with two beef patties, smoked ham, onions, lettuce, tomatoes, fries, and salad Or the chicken breast marinated in tequila with cilantro, guacamole, and beans. Vegetarian upon request. Open 24/7. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Café la Especial Avenida Revolución #718 (down the market steps), Baja, 664-685-6654. Café la Especial was once a great favorite of American aficionados of Tijuana's bullfights at the old downtown Plaza de Toros. Summer Sundays, fans would crowd into the café to chow down before the fights or rush back afterwards for a few drinks and a hearty meal. Inside, little has changed, not even the 50-50 locals-to-gringos ratio. Food is standard Mexican/American border fare, from tacos and tamales to carne asada and bistek ranchero, from cactus and eggs to steak and eggs. Vegetarian upon request. But the atmosphere is the real draw: the low ceiling, varnished wood, black furniture with flowers painted up and down the legs and portraits on the backs, and lots of murals of Mexico on the walls. Owner Humberto Brambila's aunt Justina started it all, he says, in 1948, with the steamed taco stand upstairs. That's still going too. Open daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* 

### CENTRAL

Apertivo 3926 30th Street, North Park, 619-297-7799. This wine bar-bistro of-fers *tapasi* of simple Italian classics lightened up and scaled down to mediumsize portions - about the size you probably eat at home. All the condiments are on the table, so you can season or cheese your food to taste as you go instead of having a waiter waft them before you've lifted a fork. Good dishes include prosciutto-wrapped shrimp, eggplant rollatini, and for dessert, an airy lemon cheesecake mousse. Parking via alley

Arrivederci 3845 Fourth Street, Hillcrest, 619-299-6282. However you picture an idealized Italian restaurant sprawling café; on the strada or little cozy corner as in *Moonstruck* — somehow Arrividerci is it. The straight-from-Rome look of the crowded sidewalk deck and vellow-and-white awning helps. The menu is a big yet familiar regional pot-pourri. Reliable standards include *vitello* bel monte (veal in a brandy cream sauce with tomatoes), "straw and hay" (paglio e fieno al pesto), pale yellow-and-green pasta with string beans and pine nuts in a delicious pesto sauce, or shellfish pasta dishes like linguine mediterraneo, with clams, mussels, and big garlicky shrimp. Part of the fun is bumping chairs. Think dining car on a narrow-gauge railroad
— you're that close to the next table. Lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. —

Tenth Avenue, Downtown, 619-531-8869. The whole bricky, postindustrial thing that rules the Gaslamp really works here. This ex-horse carriage repair shop is one cool hangout, left as is except for a "relaxing room" that divides the two eating/drinking areas by a metal coil curtain and "rugs" made of old inner tube strips. But what really defines Basic is Connecticut, the state that —who knew? — gave us the pizza. Direct from New Haven comes the "thinnest pizza in the country," according to the owners. Try the mashed potato pizza with cheese

owner Mel Johnson was one of the founders of the Gaslamp's late, great Juke Joint Café. The food he serves at Batter Up! is less ambitious (so far) — but talent will tell. The food at this friendly, casual sports bar (about ten minutes from Petco via the 94) may be pub grub, but the cooking is serious. Fried fish, fried shrimp, thick sandwiches, and juicy Certified Angus burgers with creative dressings are well above the norm. Free parking in large lot patrolled by security guards. First-timers should request sauces (especially the house hot sauce) on the side until you know whether you like them. Fairly noisy inside (depending on what's on TV); quiet patio outside. Open daily, lunch and dinner, with early closing Sundays. Inexpensive. - N.W.

Bay Café 1050 North Harbor Drive, Downtown, 619-595-1083. If you're hungry at the city ferry landing, you can eat in the bare-bones interior or take your tray upstairs to a handsome bayview terrace (with no wheelchair access). After a chilly crossing, try the enjoyable New England-style clam chowder, which is milky, clean, and not over-thickened, with tender clams and tiny diced potatoes. The menu features

breakfast dishes, burgers, sandwiches (all served with generic fries), variations on fish-and-chips including prawns, plus some entrée salads. The burgers are genuinely "have it your way" — for a few extra cents each, the kitchen will add extra ingredients (Jack or Cheddar, mushrooms, grilled onions, bacon, jalapeño). Open daily, 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Inexpension.

Bertrand at Mister A's 2550 Fifth Avenue, 12th floor, Banker's Hill, 619-239-1377. Bertrand Hug's airy, open renovation of this formerly "ancient regime" eatery offers a fabled panoramic city view with a casual-chic, highly romantic ambience. Chef Stéphane Voitzwinkler's modern French cuisine is a fine fit for the setting, including bistro classics and fresh inventions, emphasizing top-grade seasonal ingredients. A huge, intelligent wine list covers a full range of prices, ages, and origins, including "ripe" first-growth Bordeaux. Smoking and fair-weather dining on wraparound terrace/observation deck. Note: parking entrance on Fourth Avenue; wheelchair access via ramp to left of reception desk. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Expensive. —











Blue Point 565 Fifth Avenue, Downtown, 619-233-6623. In a handsome plushy dining room, pristine seafood and Prime-grade steaks and chops are featured in well-focused preparations highlighting Pacific Rim and Mediterranean flavors. A fine lobster bisque includes plenty of lobster, and crab-stuffed trout and dayboat scallops are among the highlights of the menu. But at this conventioneers' favorite, be sure to specify the doneness you prefer, especially for fish, which defaults to well-done. Valet parking onsite, or inexpensive self-parking one block east at Park It On Market. Large sidewalk dining patio. Businesscasual dress looks best here. Reservations urged. Dinner nightly. - N.W.

Café Noir 447 Ninth Avenue, Down town, 619-235-0075. It's a miracle this little old house is here at all. On every side, condo towers rise up. But the twostoried 1886 Hiatt House is protected by the Mother of East Village, Gloria Poore She bought it, preserved it, painted it black, put an umbrella deck on it, and has expanded it from a straight coffee place to include a light eatery. Highlights include interesting *soup du jour* and a panini with grilled chicken, artichoke, cranberries, and parmesan and cream cheese all stuffed inside. Open 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Café Zia 6686 El Cajon Boulevard, College Area, 619-337-3937. South Asia meets Mexico! Khaled Zia had the brilliant idea of combining wraps with chicken and South Asia's great gift to the world: chutney — mango, papaya, peach, apple, even a serrano chili pepper chutney. The combo works with them all. As soon as you smell the chicken strips hissing away on the grills, you're hooked. Then when they come smoth ered in peach or mango chutney, or cooling yogurt, along with sweet-sauced potatoes, what can you do? Do as half of San Diego State does: just say yes. Open daily. Inexpensive. — *E.B.* 

Ciro's Pizzeria — Hillcrest 1202 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-296-2476. This small pizza parlor with the oh-so cool logo has that "back east" feel about it. Lots of old-time photos inside of baseball fields, New York City, and a huge 9/11 mural. The guys at Ciro's ("and it's pronounced 'Chiros,"") say the recipe for their dough ("flour, sugar, salt, yeast, water") is the simplest, the most traditional. Best combo: chicken bacon pesto. Open daily till late. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Dakota Grill and Spirits 901 Fifth Avenue, Downtown, 619-234-5554. The name may hint at cowboy cooking, but look for simple mid-American comfort food at one of the many local eateries under the Cohn Restaurant Group aegis. A typical entrée includes a hunk of red (or "the other white") meat cooked on a wood-fired grill, smeared with a precooked sauce that, for better or worse, first meets its mate on the plate. Meatavoiders will find fish and poultry dishes, too. Tasty taters but dull veggies come with most entrées. Desserts run to fruity favorites like cobblers, crisps, and upside-down cake Treats from the wide ranging beverage list include three-glass wine flights in four styles of wine, and a pleasant house brew, Dakota Pale Ale, that suits the food. The two-floor restaurant offers big plush booths, tall windowed walls, and a piano player gliding from rinky-dink 1950s pop to Fats Waller stylings and Ellingtonian riffs. Valet parking. Full bar. Lunch weekdays; dinner nightly. High moderate to expensive. -

**Dublin Square** 554 Fourth Avenue, Downtown, 619-239-5818. The entire pub was handcrafted in Waterford, shipped over, and installed (by Irish craftsmen) in the Gaslamp. The exterior indeed resembles a real (but very new) Dublin pub; the interior has authentically dim lighting and spirited Irish music, including live bands (acoustic but loud) during happy hours and some evenings. If you're looking for food, too, there's a fine corned beef and cabbage, resembling the corned beef of Katz's Deli on the Lower East Side — it's that wee touch o' the garlic that does the trick. Other choices include Guinness beef stew, shepherd's pie (made with ground beef), steaks, lamb medallion, fish-andchips, and grilled fish, plus standard pub grub. Lunch and dinner (including Irish breakfast anytime) daily. Moderate. -

**Emerald Chinese Seafood Restaurant** 3709 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888. Arguably the best Chinese restaurant in the county, here's where local Asians (of all nations) go for both casual family dinners and special feasts of Hong Kong specialties. When you dig in, you'll know why. Menu (trilingual in Chinese, Vietnamese, and English) emphasizes seafood and gour-met delicacies of the South China coast, plus lunchtime dim sum carts daily. The staff is bilingual and crisply helpful, and the specialties are well worth exploring. Reservations accepted for all meals, including weekend dim sum brunches. Few dishes include MSG; diners can request none in made-to-order dishes. Live fish tanks, full bar, serviceable wine list. Mainly moderate, with moderate splurges like live fish and Peking duck easily balanced by inexpensive down-home dishes (unless you insist on shark fin or bird's nest). Open daily from lunch until midnight or later. — *N.W.* 

The Fish Market 750 North Harbor Drive, Downtown, 619-232-3474. There's something fishy about these crowded, noisy, ever-multiplying restaurants — namely, mesquite-grilled, skew-ered, steamed, or panko-fried seafood, plus piscine chowders, pastas, and salads. Preparations are generally simple and consistent among locations. All the raw seafood is processed at the chain's Northern California facilities, so when the menu refers to a "local" species it

merely means it's from somewhere in the Pacific. Small retail fish market in the downtown branch offers slightly fresher products than at most supermarkets. Identical products and dishes are served in the dining room, the oyster bar, and at Top of the Market. But the sushi bar is emphatically the top Fish Market venue, with just-right rice, pristine seafood, and expert preparation. The Ichiban Hamachi (also available in the dining rooms) is outstanding. No reservations, but the space is vast so waits are brief. Restaurant open daily, lunch and dinner. Moderate to expensive. Also in Del Mar at 640 Via de la Valle, 858-755-2277; mini-branch near Fashion Valley, 2401 Fenton Parkway, 619-280-2277.

Heaven Sent Desserts 3001 University Avenue, North Park, 619-793-4758. The developing district around the North Park Theatre desperately needed a bakery, and Heaven Sent arrived — and then happily upgraded to a more professional operation in 2008. Under pastry chef Tina Luu (a local who's worked at some of San Francisco's top eateries), Heaven Sent produces a full range of desserts including cookies, tarts, pies, custards, puddings, and intricate cakes and ice cream fantasias. The style is rich and often fancy with choices ranging from hearty American favorites to ethe-real (but not low-cal or low-carb) Eurostyle elaborations on the theme of sweet. To drink: coffee, excellent espresso, teas, hot chocolate, Italian sodas, and fruit juice. Open daily breakfast until after dinner, past 11 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. — N.W.

Indigo Grill 1536 India Street, Little Italy, 619-234-6802. This second — and much grander - incarnation of chef Deborah Scott's Indigo Grill expands her original Native-American motif, with its focus on root vegetables, game, and roasted spices. Now, the Pacific Coastal cuisine takes in more coast than most, drawing upon ingredients and techniques from Alaska to Oaxaca. (The

decor, dark and urban-primitive, follows the theme.) Unexpected combinations are a mainstay; a single dish, such as the seafood mixto, may span the entire distance, bringing together a multitude of flavors that work together to create a wondrous whole. Fine breads are made in-house, as are desserts (try the decadent, crispy-creamy plantain cheesecake flautas). The wine list includes interesting varietals. Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly; closes early Sundays, but open until 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Lunch: inexpensive to moderate; dinner: moderate to expensive. — A.M.

Inn at the Park 3615 Fifth Avenue Banker's Hill, 619-291-0999, Gay and straight mingle nightly at the piano bar of this charming spot (although Fridays are *très gai*), brought together by lively performances of Broadway show tunes. Across the aisle is the dining room, where the fare could be described as Log Cabin Republican cuisine — despite a touch of mango here, chipotle there, it's mainly the nice, conservative, meat-and-pota-toes comfort food that the regulars here prefer. Wilder hits include calamari fritto misto, duck breast, and coconut-lime crème brûlée. But mainly, this is one of the world's sweetest scenes, always fun for a drink and a bite. Lunchtime weekdays, the scene shifts to the rooftop Top of the Park, for scenery with the sand-wiches. Reservations advised, as hotel guests have dibs on tables. - N.W.

Jsix 616 I Street, Downtown, 619-531 8744. Chef Christian Graves is proud to be a card-carrying Slow Foodie, a movement dedicated to preserving traditional ways of farming, cooking, and caring for our food and planet. At Isix, the kitchen bakes the breads and chef Graves cures charcuterie and makes sausages. The menu offers gently reared free-range meats and local produce. The chef's assortment of charcuterie - sausage, cured beef, and smoked ham - is impossible to pass up. "Small plates" are not so small and will have you wiping the platters with the fresh bread, especially

the devastating white-corn ravioli in season. Waitstaff talks up the seafood, but the beef dishes are even better — rib eye and Angus short ribs, especially. Wine list is wide and creative. The rooftop J6Bar Lounge is crowded but fun for cocktails, sandwiches, and snacks, Breakfast, lunch, and dinner daily, plus weekend brunch. Dinner reservations advised, especially on weekends. Grazing meals moderate to expensive, full dinners very expensive. — N.W.

Kansas City Barbecue 610 West Market Street, Downtown, 619-231-9680. Scrumptious smells waft across the tracks at the Seaport Village trolley stop barbecued pork and beef. And yeah, this is the joint where Tom Cruise and Kelly McGillis did their sleazy bar scene in Top Gun. And it is kinda sleazy, especially in the shadowy horseshoe bar, with memorabilia like hanging bras, Czech license plates, and stickers ("Grow Your Own Dope: Plant A Man"). The beef and pork ribs (or rib tips or chicken breast) pork ribs (or rib ups or chicken breast) are worth it. They're cooked over an oak-fueled fire. Nice long happy hour (3:30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m., at bar only) has great food/grub deals. Open daily, lunch until late, serving until 2 a.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *E.B.* 

Kemo Sabe 3958 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-220-6802. Audacity is Chef Deborah Scott's culinary signature. In her cooking, Southeast Asia meets the Southwest, with Japanese touches and towering heaps of garnishes. All the edible froufrou decorating the appetizers can wear you out, but most entrées are more focused and friendly. Good choices include a starter of mussels in a seductive chipotle cream sauce, and entrées of spicy, sweet-sour layered "jerk" chicken or the signature "Skirts On Fire," a miraculously tender grilled skirt steak imbued with a picante marinade. Desserts by Sharon Bristol follow the house style sky-high, ornate, complex. Casual atmosphere, very noisy. Heated patio. Dinner served daily. Reservations strongly advised. Moderate. - N.W.

"Early-bird" three-course dinner moderate; regular menu moderate to expensive. — N.W.

King's Fish House 825 Camino de la Reina, Mission Valley, 619-574-1230, To find King's in the mega-mall, go slightly west of Fudruckers and follow the line of cars to the free valet parking. It's a chain but it's a classy chain, offering fish and seafoods of a quality that's well above average, including crustaceans from a live tank and a half-dozen varieties of pris-tine oysters. Generously-sized entrées come with soup or salad (including a Caesar that's above suspicion) and two hefty side dishes. The vast menu of American-style preparations changes daily to reflect the fresh catch, and includes some rotating regional specialties (e.g., New Orleans, Hawaii, New England). Don't miss the prawn pot-sticker appetizer, if available, and for dessert, the miraculously light bread pudding. The atmosphere is good-timey (with two patios and a barroom as well as a dining room), the service is enthusiastic, and the management will accommodate special requests if you call ahead. Kiddie menu available. Open daily, lunch and dinner, Moderate. — N.W.

This rustic-looking restaurant is animated with antic humor (check the multilingual graffiti on the walls) and offers unique, flavor-bomb dishes. Don't miss the world-beating beefy, herb-jungle borscht (beet soup but it's way more than that), the Lobio bean dip, and Olivier salad. The chef slow-smokes his moist barbecued beef and pork and cold-smokes whole trout a treat as a group appetizer or summer entrée. On weekends, there's sublimely smoky shashlik (shish kebab). The printed menu is only a hint as to what's really cooking, and regular patrons get the best off-menu choices. So become a regular. Street parking is dire. Reservations advised for weekend dinners. Dinner nightly (service until 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday). Moderate. — N.W.

La Posta de Acapulco 3980 Third Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-295-8982. (Also in Lakeside and Spring Valley.) People have been coming to this orange-and-white drive-through-without-cars for 20 years. One of the main reasons is the carne asada burritos. Rich-tasting, fresh, generous. Folks sit around the outside benches right next to Washington Street, oblivious to the traffic. Also much loved here are the chile verde and the quesadilla with carne asada. For breakfast, think chorizo burrito. And for value, just to fill you up, you can't beat the bean tostada. You can drink horchata, a rice drink, or jamaica, made from hibiscus flower, to complete the picture. Open 24 hours in Hillcrest. Inexpensive. — E.B.

vintage restaurant's classic chophouse wet-aged USDA Prime beefsteaks and roasts with luxurious "Continental" sauces, plus some seafood, poultry, and other odd meats (including milk-fed calf's liver), served in what looks like a cozy English gentlemen's club writ large. If you've ever wanted to try Beef Wellington, the chef here is one of the few who can pull it off correctly. At weekday lunches, the place buzzes with down-town movers and shakers, but dinner hours are usually serene and gracious (reserve anyway). An awesome international wine list, strong on great French bottles (and scant on affordable ones); no corkage Friday & Sunday, Full bar, Lunch weekdays, dinner nightly. Very expensive, but offers three-course prix fixe menu for \$40/person. — N.W.

Sally's Seafood on the Water One Market Place at Manchester Grand Hyatt, Downtown, 619-358-6740. One of the city's favorite romantic restaurants. Sally's is an outbuilding behind the Grand Hyatt at the edge of Seaport Village and boasts lovely scenery, with cityscapes or bay views seen through picture windows or enjoyed from the outdoor patio in fair weather. The fare is Asian-fusion, emphasizing seafood and also offering sushi and sashimi. An appetizer sampler for two makes delicious shared grazing, as does a raw tuna and salmon Napoleon layered on fried wonton strip, while black cod with miso-orange broth is a sensuous entrée. Another option is reserving the "chef's table" in the kitchen for a custom-made meal. The mostly Californian wine list is rather steep, with plenty by the glass (at high markups), plus a serious sake list on the sushi menu. Full bar. Long walk from the hotel garage (with validated self-parking) but no barriers to mobility devices; dining room noisy at times. Lunch and dinner daily. Expensive. — N.W.

What you're eating is basically Persian health food — most Persian fare is healthy food anyway. Try the pomegranate soup, made of spinach with lentils, beans, wheat, and pomegranate juice, or the strawberry tabbouleh salad. Lamb is often a part of dishes. Ghourmeh sabzi is a lamb stew. Koufteh-Berenji is a ball of basmati rice with lamb, eggs, onions, and plums. The selection of teas includes Caspian, decaffeinated peach, and a few others. Lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Stingaree 454 Sixth Avenue, Downtown, 619-544-0867. This huge restaurant has a nightclub on the mezzanine and an outdoor lounge on the roof. The Mediterranean food by chef Antonio Friscia comes in three plate sizes - little, medium, and large. It's a built-in invitation to graze and share if you want to keep it light before you go dancing. The fare features premium, naturally raised meats, wild fish, and local organic vegetables. The rich international wine list is steep, but there's plenty by the glass; full bar. Friday and Saturday nights, dinner is a three- or four-course prix fixe only (your choices from the à la carte menu), but that gets you free entry into the club. Reservations advisable, urged for weekends. Dinner Tuesday through Saturday. Very expensive, but special three-course menu is just \$40. — *N.W.* 

Taste of Africa Cuisine 5241 University Avenue, City Heights, 619-583-5788. This is one of the main gathering places for Somalis in San Diego, but they welcome others to sample their food which is a combination of African, Italian, Arab, and Indian influences. Fish plays a big role in the diet of a country

that boasts the longest coastline in Africa, but so does lamb and goat meat. Start with a *fadareshin*, a mixed plate of roasted goat meat, fried fish, basmati rice (the Indian influence), and a pile of spaghetti — common since the Italians came to colonize. No meal is complete without bananas, which are mixed in with pretty much everything, especially soups. Open three meals daily. Inexpensive. — £.B.

Taste of Szechuan 670 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-291-1668. Friendly staff serves up standard Szechuan Mandarin fare at this archetypal Chinese restaurant. Szechuan Garlic Shrimp is number one on the list of twelve House Specialties for good reason. This tangy dish of crispy, deep-fried shrimp is one of their best. Not often seen on the menus of strip-mall Chinese restaurants, the Szechuan Orange Fish is also recommended, but don't be misled by the "hot and spicy" star next to this item. As with any of their "spicy" offerings, the heat in this dish barely registers. Spice lovers should ask for an extra kick. The Toffee Banana and Toffee Apple desserts may tempt you, but unless you have a dentist on-call, it's best to pass on these super-sticky sweets. Inexpensive lunch specials. Open till midnight Monday through Thursday, 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday, Sunday until 10 p.m. Inexpensive to moderate. — *B.D.*

### BASIC RISOTTO

BY JEFF ROSSMAN Executive Chef, Terra

I learned to cook on the job. My dad opened up Pam Pam Café and Grill in Hotel Circle, and I managed the floor at night. During the day, I used to mess around with a friend of mine and create new recipes. It was actually really successful. I would create recipes during the day and the chefs would make them that night. I had to read a lot — this was before the Food Network — and I did some research on the Internet. One recipe I came up with was Pam Pam Rollups. We did a bunch of different things in tortillas and fancy

salsas and people loved them. This was in 1996 and way before wraps hit San Diego. We were ahead of our time with the things we were making.

I do cook some at home, but I try not to do too, too much. I've tried to grow things at home and start a garden, but with two restaurants and two catering companies, it's difficult to find the time. It goes without saying that if you own your own business you put more into it.

I do love to grill, though. I love the barbecue. Just two days ago I took home some top sirloins, loaded them up with blackening spice, fired it up on the grill, and piled it up on lettuce for a big salad. I do salmon on the grill, too. And I love vegetables. Like, garlic broccoli with tilapia. I'll eat anything on the grill: grilled onions, grilled potatoes with salt. I also love comfort food, like risotto. You can't go wrong with that. And it's great in cold weather.

### INGREDIENTS

4-5 cups chicken stock or broth 1/4 cup olive oil 2 cups Arborio rice 2 T garlic, chopped 2 T shallots, chopped

She's playing on words here: Trang once owned Pho Bolsa on University Avenue, and every Vietnamese knows pho bo is Vietnam's most popular quick meal, a beef rice noodle soup. At this location, Trang still makes excellent pho bo, but she has 122 other items as vell, including fried catfish with ginger fish sauce, healthy (nonfried) Viet-namese spring rolls, or egg rolls with lettuce and mint in which to wrap them (sprinkled with nuoc mam, Vietnamese fish sauce). We're talking family-style cooking. Come once and Trang will remember you and everything you ate even if it was just pho bo. Inexpensive.

Cabana Cove 777 Harrah's Way, Valley Center, 877-777-2457. This fun eatery brings Pacific Beach to Valley Center with its cheerful (make that gorgeous) surfer decor and a menu of classy surfer grub. With glass walls looking out on the mountains and on two curvy swimming pools, this is the only restaurant in the casino to offer views of the outer world. The eclectic menu, from surfing spots around the world, includes wonderful, smoky pork as both a taco and an entrée, plus pristine seafood choices. Full bar, creative cocktails. Breakfast Monday through Friday; lunch and dinner daily. Moderate. — N.W.

Golden Egg Omelet House 316 Avenue, Escondido, 760-489-6420. This breakfast-lunch treasurehouse is vast but cute, its brick walls and open beams festooned with knickknacks (all for sale). This is the place on Sunday mornings, when three generations bond over great, generous breakfasts. Omelets are perfect — light, thin crêpe-like eggs wrapped around tall mounds of elaborate fillings. Thick waffles can be topped with fresh seasonal fruit. And then there are eggs, hash, crêpes, humongous burg-ers, and sandwiches. The potato casseroles, with a choice of a dozen fillings, are as huge in flavor as they are in size. Whatever you choose will carry you through until dinner. Reservations on weekends. the alcohol by letting it cook for about 2 minutes. Turn the heat to medium low and then add 1 cup of the heated stock and cook, stirring until the rice has absorbed the liquid.

Add the remaining broth, 1 cup at a time.
Continue to cook and stir,

allowing the rice to absorb each addition of broth before adding more. The risotto should be slightly firm and creamy, not mushy. Season with salt and pepper and add the Parmesan. Cook briefly until melted. Add the parsley and serve.

Note: You can add

The vast wine list is mostly Italian, red, and expensive. Validated parking, heated outdoor patio available. Long happy hour in bar (2 p.m. until closing weeknights, all evening Saturdays) offering bargain-price tapas and discounted wines. Plenty in the pasta realm for lacto-vegetarians. Regular meals upper moderate to expensive. Lunch and dinner weekdays, dinner only on Saturdays. — N.W.

### **NORTH COASTAL**

Le Bambou 2634 Del Mar Heights Road, Del Mar, 858-259-8138. No mere "pho joint," this lovely restaurant serves the sophisticated Vietnamese cuisine of prewar Saigon — and the owners' daughters serve it in the flower-bedecked dining room with grace, intelli-gence, and evident pleasure in teaching Westerners about the cuisine. Appetizers (most of them designed for rolling with fresh herbs in lettuce leaves and eating with your hands) are varied and of superb quality. Few restaurants here do the royal delicacy of ground shrimp on sugar cane so well. Most of the house specialty entrées are equally accomplished. Lacqué duck, sautéed shrimps or scallops in tamarind sauce, and Star of the Sea curry are outstanding. The gently priced wine list abounds in the fruity whites that go so well with this cuisine, while beer-quaffers can enjoy Vietnam's own "33" brand. Lunch Tuesday through Friday, dinner Tuesday through Sunday. Low moderate.

**El Callejon Restaurant** 345 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-634-2793. This is a Mexican restaurant with a difference: Instead of the standard boring border foods and combo plates, it offers a long menu of genuine, zesty mainland dishes, some with original

spins on traditional themes. Shrimp *zarandeados* with a rich sauce of chiles and beef in cilantro sauce are some of the delights. There's even a *parrillada* (mixed grill) to serve two. The atmosphere offers more pleasures. At lunchtime, the dining room seems like a serene hacienda. Evenings the restaurant may turn into a rollicking community center, where multi-generational families and groups of friends fill the dining rooms and spill onto the sizable patio hidden in back. Mariachi band on Fridays and Saturdays. — *N.W.* 

The Calypso Café 576 North Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-632-8252. This "Calypso" has nothing to do with Caribbean music (or food), despite its tropical tiki-hut decor. The cuisine is French, ranging from old warhorses like onion soup and coq au vin to newfangled Gallo-Cal-Italian-Pacific Rim hyphenates. The traditional dishes are generally the most successful. Mussels are the house specialty, and their rapid turnover here ensures freshness. Although there's nothing revolutionary coming from this kitchen, the cooking is generally agreeable. Dinner nightly, reservations advised. Upper moderate. — N.W.

Firenze 162 South Rancho Santa Fe Road, Encinitas, 760-944-9000. This big, beautiful, gracious restaurant (located in the same mall as Harvest Ranch Market, just north of Rancho Santa Fe) offers both a handsome interior and a romantic fire-lit patio. The well-spaced tables are laden with huge portions of accomplished, multiregional Italian cuisine and reasonably priced Italian and California wines (with half-price wines Monday nights). Vegetarians will rejoice in the two dozen meatless selections. Lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday, dinner only on Sunday. High moderate. — N.W.

Jake's Del Mar Waterfront Grill 1660 Coast Boulevard, Del Mar, 858-755-2002. Offering surf and turf by the sea, Jake's not only hugs the oceanfront,



with a patio overlooking the waves, but has a smaller patio next to Powerhouse Park, with its fragrant mimosa plants, where you can walk off the calories. A branch of the well-known Hawaiian chain, Duke's, Jake's' fare is competently cooked, if not inspired. The seafood may flaunt fusion-y, sugary touches, while steaks are Prime or high-grade Choice, Portions are huge — the tasty Dungeness crab cake appetizer is size able enough for a substantial lunch, offering loads of crab and little filler. Location is very popular with locals and tourists both, so reservations urged for any meal, essential for the à la carte Sunday brunch. Lunch Tuesday through Saturday, dinner nightly, brunch Sunday. Lunch and brunch moderate, dinner expensive. — N.W.

Paul's Place 3671 Mission Avenue Oceanside, 760-721-0124. This restaurant looks like a McDonald's or Wendy's (the building used to be a franchise) and the food comes fast, but it's no chain. The menu strikes a balance between American and Greek fare. The baked Greek half-chicken, the spiced grilled chicken sliced up on a salad with pita bread, and the gyros (all at earthy prices) mix with all-American threeegg breakfast specials with home fries. Lunch offers include meaty hamburg ers, gyros with fries, or a surprisingly tasty turkey burger. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Ruth's Chris Steak House — Carmel Valley 11582 El Camino Real, Carmel Valley, 858-755-1454. Flash-cooked steaks from fine (albeit wet-aged) USDA Prime, topped with butter and parsley, are the hallmark of this 95-location chain. All side dishes are à la carte, sized for two or more. The broiled tomatoes — caramelized with a touch of sugar — are a delight, and potatoes are offered in eight guises. Starters include gooey stuffed mushrooms and an outstanding take on America's now ubiquitous seared ahi. But there's another side to this restaurant. True to its New Orleans origins, it offers a number of Louisiana dishes cooked in the rich, delicate, non-spicy manner of a French plantation (or old NOLA stalwart Antoine's) including shrimp remoulade; a thin tomatoey gumbo; an atypically

creamy BBQ shrimp and a terrific, authentic bread pudding drenched in whisky sauce. Non-beef-eaters can also choose from luxurious seafood dishes, a cheese-stuffed chicken breast, grilled portobellos, and more. Award-winning wine list is steep but serious. The down-town location harbors a stunning seaside view. Dinner nightly; lunch Friday only. Very expensive. — N.W.

Vigilucci's — Encinitas 505 South Coast Highway 101, Encinitas, 760-942-7332. In the Land of 10,000 Trattorias this is one of the most popular — and for good reason. The restaurant's motto, "a little piece of Italy," is actually accurate. Freshness, simplicity, and savvy seasoning — that's Italian. The pastas are luscious (try the comforting cannelloni with an unusual stewed meat stuffing) and the flavorful entrées come with honest fresh vegetables. The staff is bouncy and jokey, the wines are mainly affordable, and spirits run high. Of course it's crowded, so reserve to avoid a long, hungry wait. Other locations include Vigilucci Cucina in Carlsbad, Vigilucci's Pizzeria in Leucadia, and Vigilucci's Seafood and Steakhouse in Carlsbad. — N.W.

Vivace 7100 Four Seasons Point, Carlsbad, 760-603-3773. If you ever wished to eat like the Medicis did, here's the place for it. This lovely hotel-restaurant at a gorgeous resort showcases Italian haute cuisine which is simpler and more natural than the French equivalent. You'll find inventive combinations of first-class ingredients, skillfully executed and beautifully presented with none of the culinary cliches of the mamma mia joints. Reservations urged. Valet parking free for diners. Resort-casual - no hats, shorts or jeans, or sandals — but room may be painfully noisy if patrons get too festive. Dinner seven nights. Four-course tasting dinner a relative bargain, but wine list may blow the budget. Moderate (pastas and risottos) to very expensive. - N.W.

### **SOUTH BAY**

Galley at the Marina 550 Marina Parkway, Chula Vista, 619-422-5714. This is a great place to relax, take in the view, and decide which yacht you're gonna buy when you win the lotto. It's run by Fran Muncey, widow of Bill Muncey, San Diego's greatest speedboat-racing champion. The tasty, bargain-priced happy hour specials (3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday) make a visit worth the trip west of I-5: have a 1/2-pound hamburger with french fries, chicken Caesar salad with sourdough toast, or a filet mignon steak plate with steak fries. Next morning, catch the breakfast favorite: biscuits and sausage gravy with eggs. Inexpensive.

Lai Thai Restaurant 1430 East Plaza Boulevard #E10, National City, 619-474-5546. Lai Thai started up as the lone Thai in a sea of Filipino restaurants in South Bay, but has gained a respected place under glamorous Summawadee Bubpha. Prices are so reasonable, you feel the food shouldn't come on such beautiful platters. The soups, tom kah (spicy coconut), and tom yum (hot and ur), are especially good, as is the house sour), are especially good, as is the nouse Lai Thai Fish (usually tilapia) in delicious panang coconut-curry sauce. But you've got to push for spiciness if you want it. Lunch deals are really cheap. Also check out the Thai art on the walls, some for sale. Open lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — E.B.

Swaddee Thai 1001 C Avenue, Coronado, 619-435-8110. Tourists never stray to Swaddee's quiet residential lo-cation a block from the bright lights of Orange Avenue. Their loss is the locals' gain. The dining room is a quiet, lovely haven from the hustle; the service is caring and gracious. Even if the long list of Siamese specialties is merely standard, the kitchen, too, is devoted to the art of gently giving pleasure. The peanut sauce accompanying the *sate*, for instance, is classically balanced; the complex but soothing coconut-chicken soup can wash away all cares; and the calamari in the many seafood arrays is cleverly knife-scored to achieve sheer tenderness along with good looks. Even the jasmine rice is an exceptionally fragrant brand. Unless you specify otherwise, spicy dishes have a nice nip tuned to rave-but-tender farang tastebuds. Lunch and dinner daily. Inexpensive to moderate. — N.W.

Thai Café — Coronado 1201 First Street, Coronado, 619-522-0217. Tourists may not take this little opensided kiosk restaurant at Coronado's Ferry Landing seriously, but this has to be some of the best-prepared Thai food in the county. It's all laid out buffet style in chafing dishes. You can sample before you commit. They're all good. None of

Village Club Card Room 429 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-425-3333. Yes, it's mostly poker players, but any-body can come in and order a meal. And here's the thing: first-time players get their meal free. Of course, the idea is to keep players' bellies full so they can return to the game, so even second-timers get a deal with down-home comfort-dishes like grilled chicken breast sandwich, spaghetti with meatballs and garlic bread, or garlic shrimp with fried rice and egg, plus Chinese dishes including Kung Pao beef or chicken, Mongolian beef, and a good wonton soup with noodles. Cardroom open and non-Chinese food menu available 24 hours; Chinese menu noon to 4 a.m. Inexpensive. — E.B.

### **EAST COUNTY**

Fix Me a Plate Café 9168 Fletcher Parkway, La Mesa, 619-466-6084. Chefowner Iimmy Pomier was executive chef at the great Juke Joint Café, and now he's got his own place to serve up whopping portions of authentic Cajun and Louisiana-style soul food. His oyster po boy is (as France's Michelin Guide might say) "worth a detour," as good as it gets this far away. His gumbo is eccentric; his deep-fried chicken gizzards with

aioli are fun. His delicious étouffées are among the highlights of the long menu (on which not all dishes are available all the time). Skimpy wine and beer selection, and BYOB is strictly forbidden. but the lemonade is okay. Lunch and dinner Tuesday through Sunday (with break in between). Inexpensive to moderate. - N.W.

Johnny B's 4728 Fourth Street, La Mesa, 619-464-2465. This "Burgers and Brew" bar is a real 1950s place with burgers to die for and good bar snacks. including a zesty jalapeño dip. Play pool, watch TV, hide from your ex on the smoker's patio out back. On Sundays (1 p.m. to 7 p.m. only), their tenounce New York steak, fries, beans, and salad is a must-eat at a rock-bottom price. Open daily, lunch and dinner Monday through Saturday, three meals Sunday. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Ranas.Com 9683 Campo Road, Suite A, Spring Valley, 619-589-1792. With 33 Mexican restaurants in the area, this Mexico City eatery has got to be good. It's a cheery place with lime green walls and orange accents. Cooking from the capital tends to be less bitingly hot than some northern food, with unexpected taste combos, like pollo en salsa de cacahuate (an almost Thai-tasting chicken in peanut sauce which comes with rice, beans, and tortilla) Aztec huarache (cactus with potato, cheese, lettuce, sour cream, and salsa) is also easy to love. Inexpensive. — E.B.

Tyler's Taste of Texas 576 North Second Street, El Cajon, 619-444-9295. Unfussy home cooking. Some dishes outshine others. The slab of smoky ham steak that comes with the first-rate breakfast is in itself enough to rouse the sleepiest appetite. Expertly sautéed

onions and mushrooms lend flavor to fried potatoes and omelets, respectively, while pebbly-smooth hash and gingery sweet potato pancakes give the lineup character For lunch and dinner, the Texas menu features Texas-style barbecue (chicken, beef, pork, and sausage) that's sufficiently smoky, but a little uneven in texture. The barbecue beef is reliable and the sweetish sauce shows well on the chicken. Pleasant surprises: a substantial, peppery cornmeal crust on the tender catfish and the fried green tomatoes, and the rich stock in the vegetable soup. All-you-can-eat catfish Wednesdays and Fridays. Open 24 hours. Inexpensive to low moderate. -

West Coast Barbecue 606 Lake Murray Boulevard, La Mesa, 619-462-3663. This relocated revival of the popular former Bekker's BBQ serves pitsmoked Texas-style "cue" that seems more like the Bushes of Crawford, Texas than the soulful south: Meats are leaner and less smoky. Best bets are the full-fla-vored ribs (beef, baby back, spare) and chicken wings. Other cuts (brisket, pulled pork, chicken) run a little dry. The red soppin' sauce is thin, very sweet, with some tang but no heat. Most sides are rather bland, regionless picnic fare except for the good pinto beans and the outstanding, authentic Texas bean-free chili, well seasoned and classically garnished with chopped white onion and melted yellow cheese. It deserves promotion to an entrée. Dessert is a choice of canned-fruit cobblers topped with shortening pie crust. Beer and house wine; small outdoor patio. Low-moderate, inexpensive for shared takeout. Full catering services available; not confined to BBO. — N.W.



# **Light Load**

It's a higher priority to be dark and edgy and Tim Burton-y than to be kid-friendly.

Ithough movies had been set in Minnesota before Fargo (notwithstanding its misleading North Dakota title), movies as disparate as The Farmer's Daughter, The Heartbreak Kid, Purple Rain, Grumpy

Old Men, it was the Coen brothers who converted that territory into grist for the mill. On the laugh meter, Wisconsin and

Iowa don't even register. New in Town, set specifically in the small town of New Ulm, and directed by the Danishborn Jonas Elmer in his Hollywood debut, is nothing if not laboriously ground out, a campaign of cynical populism that simultaneously satirizes and sentimentalizes the natives, in a milky image that might or might not be meant to suggest the lens-fogging frost of a Northern Star winter, snowed under by the standard quota of pop songs decreed for romantic comedies. Renée Zellweger, as the fish-out-ofwater hatchet woman dispatched from Miami headquarters to downsize the

local food plant but (in due time) digging in to fight for its survival, gauges her charm at about half wattage, which proves to be about twice as charming as full wattage. (Cf. *Leatherheads*, another pinch of Minnesota grist for

> the mill.) Her reactions to snow, ice, and subzero wind are nicely mimed, and the scene of her untamably erect nipples

at her welcoming dinner party is one for the books. Harry Connick, Jr., the uninteresting love interest, has been written as a Carolina transplant to protect him from ridicule and preserve him for romance. Meantime, Siobhan Fallon Hogan, as a friend of Jesus with a secret tapioca recipe, does the heavy lifting on the Scandihoovian accent; and the character's surname of Gunderson, shared with the heroine of *Fargo*, seems an open tribute to the Coens. The casting of J.K. Simmons in a supporting part might be another.

*Coraline* is a piece of 3-D stop-motion animation about a little girl with blue



hair and ski-jump nose (everyone hears her name as Caroline, and her last name of Jones will only encourage confusion in anyone who remembers the Morticia of TV's *Addams Family*, Carolyn Jones), who, unhappy with her preoccupied parents, is lured into a parallel universe of idealized replicas — a sort of Stepford Mom and Stepford Dad — but for their button eyes. Her

price to pay for permanent residence in this universe is to trade her own eyes for buttons: "Soon you'll see things our way." (Distant echoes of *Invaders from Mars* and *Invasion of the Body Snatchers*: the lobotomy bugaboo.) Director Henry Selick, heretofore of *The Nightmare before Christmas* and *James and the Giant Peach*, pays a lot of attention to landscape and surface,

such that the film cultivates an aggressive tactility. But the dream world opens the door also to a self-indulgent succession of oddities and bizarreries — here a mouse circus, there an audience of Scotties — without much narrative drive. And it's plainly a higher priority to be dark and edgy and Tim Burton-y than to be kid-friendly. The catered-to adult is still apt to feel

something extra was needed, and the distracting 3-D neither provided it nor disguised it.

In Taken, a ring of Albanian white slavers (Middle Eastern buyers) has the bad fortune to shanghai the virgin daughter of a retired American superspy — "I was a preventer," he understates - on her first morning of vacation in Paris. There is no satisfaction in the quick-as-a-blink detective work that leads him to them, only satisfaction, for those who can take it, in watching him mow them down, a Weedwacker in a field of dandelions. (Too late to "prevent" the kidnapping, but not too late for the defiling.) Nor is there satisfaction in watching an eye-lifty Liam Neeson playing Steven Seagal. Nor in watching the native director, Pierre Morel, sell out his country on top of himself. Catharsis, you learn anew, can't come out of crud. A hot shower afterwards would be your closest approximation.

The Pink Panther 2 commissions Steve Martin to carry the Inspector Clouseau torch into a sequel, thoroughly doused though the flame may be. (Kevin Kline got out while the getting was good, leaving the role of Clouseau's superior to John Cleese, with unaltered British accent. And previous director Shawn Levy handed the bag to Harald Zwart.) The juggling of bottles from a teetering wine rack is the only flicker.

The Uninvited, an unwelcome remake of a Korean shocker, dispenses wicked-stepmother mechanics tricked up with pseudo-supernatural "visions" and a hopefully mind-blowing ending. Fuse-blowing, more likely. Elizabeth Banks, in case you're counting, shows up in her fourth film in as many months. Direction is credited to "The Guard Brothers" (Charles and Thomas), stoutly defended against Coen-brother brilliance. With some people, two heads are no better than half a brain.

Funny what turns up at the art theater these days. On its merits, Olly Blackburn's Donkey Punch, following François Truffaut's elegant Wild Child at the Ken, amounts to hardly more than grindhouse fodder, cheaply and shoddily made, to do with three girls from Leeds on holiday in Mallorca, who hook up with four guys from home for a seafaring night of illicit drugs, rough sex, and accidental homicide that spirals into thinly motivated intentional homicide. One of the girls and one of the guys mark themselves as sentimental favorites by showing some misgivings from the get-go. Everyone else is treated as if they were asking for what they get. You have the feeling when watching it that it's not so much meant to be a movie unto itself as an application for a bigger budget next time.

#### The Curious Case of Benjamin But-

ton — The central conceit, and little else, has been retained from an F. Scott Fitzgerald short story of the same name: a protagonist who ages in reverse. (The story of course was written and titled before the soundalike name of Benjamin Britten came to fame, and as long as they were changing everything else....) With a script by Eric Roth, and with an historical scope and a "special" hero that often recall his script for Forrest Gump, the movie is at some pains to shore up the plausibility of the tale — a painful undertaking for sure - and to expunge the humor of it. On screen, nothing is more absurd about it than its length, two and three-quarters hours, plenty long enough to read the Fitzgerald story five or six times over. And its wistful theme of transience frankly gains very little from the reverse-aging phenomenon, nowhere near as much as you'd want to gain from so mindbending a device. The theme, moreover, gains nothing at all from the movie's feeling of interminability. Director David Fincher, determined to show his softer side. softer than Zodiac and Panic Room and Fight Club and so on, manages first and foremost to show his technical side. The movie is replete with proficiencies of production (the periods are lavishly detailed, the brief tugboat battle with an enemy sub in WWII is dazzling, the duplex love nest is a splendid locale, etc.), and it serves as a virtual showcase for the art of makeup and/or art of digital touch-up, digital airbrush, digital prestidigitation, whatever went into the various aging effects on Brad Pitt and Cate Blanchett. The seamless surgery by which the leading man's head has been grafted onto bodies of different sizes is used, in this instance, responsibly. But it raises unsettling possibilities for the evolutionary next leap in screen body doubles. What's to prevent another filmmaker from putting Brad Pitt's head, in service of vanity, on Michael Phelps's body? Cate Blanchett's on Giselle Bündchen's? With Taraji P. Defiance — Workmanlike account of the untold (or anyhow unfilmed) true story of a 20th-century Moses and his two brothers, who sheltered hundreds of Jews from the Nazis in the forests of Belorussia, such dark days that color itself evidently went into hiding, leaving behind only a greeny or occasionally orangey residue. Daniel Craig, a blond blue-eyed Jew like Paul Newman in Exodus ("He is a Jew?" wonders aloud a plain-spoken child), delivers heroic declarations on the order of "Our revenge is to live" and "We may be hunted like animals, but we will not become animals." Natural lovelies emerge undimmed from the rustic privations to pair up with the heroes. A schoolteacher and an intellectual carry on a running sideshow of comical bickering. And Liev Schreiber, the hottest-headed of the three brothers, not content just to dodge the Nazis but itching to engage them. defects to the Red Army. The big hooray moment when he returns to the fold in the nick of time can be seen coming from so far off that we're surprised only that it didn't arrive sooner. Somehow, even with violin solos by Joshua Bell to put you in mind of Schindler's List, the saga doesn't quite sweep you up and away. But it at least stirs interest in the real story. 

**Doubt** — From the prize-winning stage play by John Patrick Shanley, an ambiguous drama of possible priestly pedophilia at a Catholic school in the Bronx. The playwright, perhaps best known to moviegoers as the writer of Moonstruck and writerdirector of Joe versus the Volcano, handles the direction of his own work on screen, and the freedoms of the medium enable him to detail operations of the parish to almost anthropological ends: the nuns' rising and dressing in the A.M., the altar boys' preparations for Mass, the crosscutting contrast between the bloody-roast-beef and red-wine dinner table of the jovial priests as against the silent and austere table of the milk-fed nuns, the students' coed dance lesson to "Blame It on the Bossa Nova," and so on. (The time, as the aforesaid musical selection would suggest, is early Sixties, the time of the playwright's own Catholic boyhood in the Bronx, although the sermon on communal despair after the JFK assassination — one of three pithy sermons in the script — could easily have been recycled post-9/11.) The three principal characters are types: the progressive priest who believes in a "friendlier" church that moves with the times, a friendliness that may or may not have gone too far in embracing the school's first black student, a vulnerable target; the hidebound and humorless old nun ("Penmanship is dying, all across this country") whose hawklike vigilance zeroes in on the priest; and the innocent and idealistic novice, young and pretty, who wants to believe the best of everyone. The clash of personalities, strictly limited by the play's title and tactical guideline, illuminates nothing so much as the players. Meryl Streep, overacting awesomely, is not only a holy terror as a nun but as a thespian, booby-trapping every scene with unforeseeable little diversions, inventions, stratagems, embellishments. Philip Seymour Hoffman and Amy Adams, no slouches themselves, appear to enjoy their one scene alone together in the courtyard, no one to steal it from them, no one to show them up or slap them down. Frost/Nixon — Playwright Peter Morgan restages the 1977 "no holds barred" TV interview of Richard Nixon by British talkshow host David Frost, and the drum-beating buildup to it. A prizefight metaphor runs throughout, permitting director Ron Howard to slip comfortably into the underdog mode of his Cinderella Man, with Frost, as it were, failing to lav a glove on Nixon going into the final round, then at last pinning him in a corner and pummeling some semblance of a confession out of him. This spectacle may satisfy the undying urge to spit on the corpse of the 37th President, as well as supply a general-purpose stand-in for the still elusive and impenitent 43rd President. (The undying urge to spit, it must be pointed out, tends to contradict the film's premise that the interview in some way provided "closure.") As a job of stage craft, however, or screencraft, it's a bit stunted, endlessly and explicitly talking out its points, and employing the unpardonable shortcut of pseudodocumentary interviews of various secondary characters, ostensibly at a later date, to further analyze, comment on, and embroider the points made elsewhere. Frozen River — Stoical prole sob story has some fresh ground to go over — the smuggling of illegal aliens through the slushy snow of the Mohawk Indian reservation on the Canadian border — and some stark scenery to go with it. Writer and director Courtney Hunt, whose plotting and pacing are sloggingly pedestrian, expends a lot of energy explaining how a law-abiding white woman could get caught up in that sideline: a gambling-addicted husband who skips out on Christmas week, a fifteen-yearold son eager to drop out of school and go to work, nothing to put under the tree for the five-year-old, a dead-end job at Yankee Dollar, bills due. Melissa Leo, aging in a characterful way, able to assume the lead role without a Charlize Theron reverse makeover, does a solid professional job, so much so as to highlight the amateurism around her. Misty Upham, Charlie McDermott, Michael O'Keefe. 2008.

★ (GASLAMP 15) **Gran Torino** — Clint Eastwood, director, serves Clint Eastwood, actor, a nice fat one, a softball lobbed right down the middle of the plate and effortlessly belted over the fence: a sort of Grumpy Old Man version of Dirty Harry, a scowler and a growler (looking and sounding uncannily like a dog in defense of a T-bone), a new widower who has seen his Detroit neighborhood taken over by Hmong immigrants ("HUMmong," in his two-syllable pronunciation), a hard-ass retiree defined by a pair of prized possessions, the M-1 rifle that commemorates his service in the Korean War and the 72 Gran Torino that commemorates his life's work on the Ford assembly line. The character's blatant bigotry toward his Asian neighbors, whereby he runs through every applicable epithet in a thesaurus of slang (past "fishhead" and "gook" all the way to "zipperhead") is somewhat problematic. Eastwood's endearing presence in the role automatically takes the edge off the racism in a way that just wouldn't happen if the role were occupied by, say, Gene Hackman, Rip Torn. And taking the edge off the racism is not altogether a good idea, regardless how many laughs you get out of it. What ultimately redeems him and his film is not the conventional, formulaic, softhearted and simple-minded warming of relations with the two weakly acted Hmong teenagers next door, and not the tighter focus of wrath on the Asian street gang that's terrorizing the neighborhood, and not even the expediently plotted climactic act of karmic restitution (which in honesty had slim chance to work out as planned). No. none of that. What redeems him and his film, lending it, for all its entertainment value, a sense of gravity and personal conviction, is simply its place in line in his ongoing penance for the offhand violence, the incalculable casualties, of his earlier career: its place behind Unforgiven, A Perfect World, Mystic River, etc. Once was not enough. It was not just lip service, like an obligatory number of Hail Mary's after a long-postponed trip to confession. It was, so it would appear, a genuine conversion, a revelation. This stands as the further proof of it, and further refinement of it. With Bee Vang, Ahney Her, Christopher Carley. 2008.

**Inkheart** — Discombobulating experience

in the vein of The Neverending Story and The Princess Bride, a defense of books framed in the form of an ugly movie. Is the ugliness deliberate? Designed to send a repulsed viewer to the placid regularity of the printed page? The postulate here has to do with a rare breed of Silver Tongues, people who, by reading aloud, bring books to life: special emphasis, therefore, on the extent to which authors control, or lose control of, their characters. The fictitious miscreants who've been let loose in the real world keep threatening to kill, but it's never established (this being strictly a children's movie) that they have that capacity. The climactic materialization of a smoke monster called The Shadow is most welcome. And Jennifer Connelly, merely glimpsed a couple of times as a character still trapped in the book, would have been welcome, too, but she doesn't even come up to the standards of a cameo. Last Chance Harvey — The septuagenarian Dustin Hoffman secures a role he

With his job on the line, he flies off to London for the weekend wedding of his only daughter, has his rightful role in the ceremony usurped by the bride's debonair stepfather, misses his return flight home, gets fired long-distance, and stays on to unload his troubles at some length to a customer-relations employee at Heathrow: Emma Thompson, towering over the leading man by four inches, and showering him with her special brand of lifelike artificiality. The social mortifications of the early stages are amusingly observed (the solitary white jacket in a crowd of black, an unremovable security device still affixed to the cuff, etc.), but the extended dialogue — a *Before Sunrise*, if you like, for the sunset years — that deepens overnight into a Serious Relationship sounds distinctly unorganic, forced forward solely by

Rachel Getting Married — A sort of Rainbow Coalition wedding weekend: the father of the Jewish bride had remarried a black, the bride too is marrying a black (it might be noted that Sidney Lumet, the father of first-time scriptwriter Jenny Lumet, had remarried a black himself), and the theme of the wedding is inexplicably Indian, Director Jonathan Demme, striving for an improvisational feel, stages the goings-on with an almost Danish dishevelment: a hand-held camera in the grasp of an arm-weary cameraman. Anne Hathaway, as the bride's just-out-of-rehab sister, a constant and tiresome threat of disruption ("She needs a lot of acknowledgment"), proves to be too actressy for the style; but Rosemarie DeWitt makes a fine impression as her well-behaved sister, and the conviviality of the gathering, with heavy representation from the cool cats of the music industry, is by and large believable and admirable. The Reader — Stephen Daldry's tight and trim adaptation of the Bernhard Schlink best-seller on German war guilt and the filial estrangement of the postwar generation. It begins in 1995 in the frigid colorless antiseptic Berlin apartment of Ralph Fiennes, lit by way of Vermeer, but soon it retreats to his adolescence in 1958, his incarnation in a very dissimilar young actor named David Kross, his scarlet fever, his torrid summer affair with an older streetcar attendant played by Kate Winslet, and his habit of

reading to her in bed and bath: The Odyssey, Huckleberry Finn, The Lady with the Little Dog, Lady Chatterley's Lover ("This is disgusting," huffs the naked lady beside him). In school, his Lit. teacher broaches the universal theme of secrecy — a nudge to us viewers — and it's clear that the boy's secret is his older lover. But what's hers? Again it's clear, from the shaded and shifting emotions of the unfailingly fascinating Winslet, that there's a lot going on inside which we don't know about. And not because Winslet, as the torrid affair abundantly lays bare, is to any degree inhibited. It would not be giving away too much to reveal that several years later, when our protagonist has enrolled in law school, his advanced seminar attends for educational purposes a war-crimes trial in which his former lover is unmasked as an S.S. officer at Auschwitz. It's still clear even then, from all the shading and shifting, that she harbors secrets. The provocation of the protagonist to divulge his own secret and to interpose himself in the proceedings becomes quite urgent and suspenseful, although in both courtroom and classroom the film has now entered a polemical mode that can only be termed uncinematic. All the same, David Hare, the screenwriter, is a fastidious wordsmith; and even if the film drags on a bit once the time line catches up to Ralph Fiennes, drags on seemingly to justify his place on the payroll, it eventually comes to a satisfying end in a highly charged sitdown between him and Lena Olin, a concentration-camp survivor. The clean clear color and the pinpoint focus (Chris Menges

 $\textbf{Revolutionary Road} \longrightarrow \operatorname{Director} \operatorname{Sam}$ Mendes returns to the suburban stamping ground of his filmmaking debut, American Beauty, but at the very opening of that territory in the 1950s, at the inception, that is to say, of all the clichés of cookie-cutter conformity, Little Boxes, the Lonely Crowd, lives of quiet desperation, and so forth. As the central couple — the Wheelers, residing with strident irony at the titular address in Connecticut, the dead end of the American Dream — it must have seemed a bright idea to reunite the lovebirds of *Titanic*, as if to hint at the illusion-shattering grimness of the married life ahead of them had the iceberg not got in the way. But the birds have matured at different rates in the intervening eleven years. Whether in rage or frustration, cajolement or surrender, Kate Winslet (Mrs. Mendes off screen) appears much too strong for Leonardo DiCaprio, whose perennial boyishness clings to him, dogs him, drags him down, even in, or perhaps especially in, his face-caving moments of total emotional nakedness: "You're not worth the powder it would take to blow you up!" (Now, now, sonny.) You could wonder, to divide the faultfinding fairly, whether she's not too strong for her own role. The movie, taking its lead from the Richard Yates novel and then going beyond the novel in search of a present-day perspective, is trying to do something a bit different, and a bit difficult, in suggesting that the would-be free Wheelers are not as superior to, or separate from, their neighbors and surroundings as they would like to imagine. and in nudging the spectators, at the same time, to recognize that they themselves are not as superior as they might suppose to the central couple, the Fifties, their neighbors today. The codified view of postwar suburbia has over the years undergone too much expansion and elaboration for the movie to escape a sense of cliché and sense of hyperbole. But the cliché and hyperbole are done to a turn. And the period and its archaisms ("I must scoot. Toodle-oo"), its formalities and manners (no one but a certified mad-

man, an institutionalized mathematician on a day pass, dares speak the truth in mixed company), combine to produce a stylization that brings out the satire in the piece. Revolutionary Road beats American Beauty, not terribly hard to do, for both seriousness and funniness. Kathy Bates, Michael Shannon, David Harbour. 2008.

Wild Child — François Truffaut's factual, unembellished re-enactment of the events set down in a French doctor's journal, having to do with the capture and gradual domestication of an adolescent found roaming the forests as a beast. The plain, semi-documentary style sits a bit strangely amid the quaint 18th-century trappings (ruffled shirts, horse-drawn carriages, etc.) and the silent-movie affectations (iris shots, stagy camera). The movie is adamant about denying its actual date, which is rather a surprise from a fashion-plate like Truffaut, and it pursues a scrupulous exactness about the physical properties of the bygone period: the starchy clothes, the antique house

hold objects, and the commonplace sounds heard around these cramped old houses the footfalls, the opening and closing of a door, the scritch-scratch of a quill pen. Truffaut's tendency toward reckless sentimentality is held in harness here, thanks partly to Nestor Almendros's calm gray images, partly to Truffaut's stiff, toneless acting as the doctor, and partly to the unfaltering sense of rhythm. 1970.

The Wrestler — It was a stroke of fortune if not of genius for filmmaker Darren Aronofsky to cast Mickey Rourke in the title role of Randy "The Ram" Robinson (né Robin Ramzinski), a Dodge Ram-driving, self-described "old broken-down piece of meat," two decades past his prime, yet persisting in plying his trade at sparsely populated venues outside the glare of TV lights, dreaming of one last big payday at a twentieth-anniversary rematch with a Southern California car salesman formerly known as The Ayatollah. Rourke, monstrously bulked up since his stint of moonlighting as a professional prizefighter, has one of the most ravaged faces in the entire gallery of once beautiful leading men, somewhere between Jan-Michael Vincent and Francisco Rabal, and his noisy, labored breathing is excruciating. There is, however, an inherent sentimentality in the basic situation, and it's not at all toughened through the by-the-numbers plotting around an attempted détente with his neglected lesbian daughter (Evan Rachel Wood), a clumsy courtship with an over-the-hill stripper (Marisa Tomei, carrying on in the before-it's-too-late exhibitionistic mode of Before the Devil Knows You're Dead, plus nipple rings and tattoos), a postmatch heart attack, a bypass operation, an obvious and inevitable self-martyrdom. Aronofsky's handheld camera follows Rourke around — often literally behind his back and over his shoulder, as in a Dardenne brothers art film — in ghoulish anticipation of a train wreck; follows him into the locker room to map out the matches with his fellow combatants (an amusing glimpse behind the scenes); follows him to

the hair salon (for upkeep of his Eighties heavy-metal mop), to the tanning salon, to his drug dealer, to his degrading day job in the stock room of a grocery store. Best scene: reluctantly working behind the deli

counter in direct contact with the customers, but really warming up to it. (Bad scene: flipping out behind the deli counter, specifically at the meat slicer.) The wrestling matches, natural dramatic climaxes, are



### **Help Too Much**

"The past is never dead; it isn't even past."

iane lost her husband, a "brilliant" CEO, in Africa. Now the socialite wants to sell the house, land a job (her first), and sever all connections with her past.

Diane's in such deep denial, her daughter says, she can't decide where to put her husband's ashes.

Ater Dahl's also in denial, But his is a protective shield. Without it, a therapist says, he's so

traumatized he might cease to function. Ater is one of the Lost Boys of Sudan. Beginning in 1983, the Sudan People's Liberation Army began a war with the Sudanese government. An estimated two million people have lost their lives, and five million have been displaced.

Barking dogs awoke Ater one morning. His village was under attack. He heard screams, then watched members of his family murdered. Like an estimated 4000 boys from 3 to 17, he fled, becoming one of the "lost boys" who ran hundreds of miles, barefoot, across the Sudan, many of them back and forth twice (there are no "lost" women or girls; they were made slaves). Ater saw more havoc by the time he was eight years old than most soldiers see in multiple tours of duty.

In Mia McCullough's Since Africa, currently at the Old Globe's second stage, Diane and Deacon Reggie Hudson attempt to "resettle" Ater in Chicago. Both mean well, but their motives become suspect. She supplies financial, the Deacon spiritual, perks. They attempt to Americanize Ater and help him forget his horrors. But neither sees him. Instead each is a Pygmalion; they see who they want him to become. Are they aiding or trying to colonize,

Since Africa plays like an extended commen-

tary on John Guare's Six Degrees of Separation, also at the Old Globe. Amid small-world nearness stand walls of separation, both personal and cultural. Breakthroughs are possible,

> though attempts to change a person often result in confirming differences — and awakened self-awareness. Diane and the Deacon learn they must let go, decontrol, as do Paul and Ouisa,


sadly, in Six Degrees.

The play's also a commentary on William Faulkner's famous line, "The past is never dead; it isn't even past." Attempts to lop off one's backstory reforge the connection.

Until mid-act 2, Since Africa is low on drama. The playwright tends to wade into a scene, for ten or so lines, then paddles hard. The best scenes, like young Eve's monologue about how she got her scar, would be much stronger if McCullough tightened the first third.

The Old Globe made a smart choice in having Seema Sueko direct Since Africa. She's staged the play before, for her Mo'olelo company, and knows its quirks. Aided by Jason Bieber, whose lighting shifts from hot blue and orange Sudanese patterns to cold Chicago interiors in a flash, and Paul Peterson's excellent sounds (Dinka chants, drumbeats that interview people), Sueko weaves an arresting mysticism

Linda Gehringer's unafraid to push Diane a few clicks past likability (she really wants to help Ater), which gives her performance, and Diane's metamorphosis, an authentic ring. Willie C. Carpenter (so memorable in the Globe's Two Trains Running as the homeless man who wanted his "ham") does a subtle turn. His Deacon gains unexpected wisdom as he

speculates about his roots. Warner Miller's Ater and Ashley Clements's young Eve add dimension to slender roles and become perplexed by what others take for granted.


Since Africa plods, at times, but also offers payoffs, especially in its critique of intentions. Kristin D. Carpenter constitutes an ongoing payoff. She plays the Nameless One, a statue come to life, who dances with vigor and joy. She could be Ater's anima (the Jungian "shadow self") or a sprightly protector watching over the Lost Boys. She helps Ater sustain a link between his past and present and, in the end, helps the others to build that bridge as well.

#### **American Buffalo**

David Mamet's terse, mean street drama has been praised for its realism. His dialogue cuts to the marrow. His three characters don't speak their minds so much as externalize their nerves. The play's realistic, but only on the surface. Buffalo grows progressively surreal. As Don, Teach, and young Bob plan to steal a coin collection, the play transforms into an inertia-dream where everyone's knee-deep in murk and one step for ward yanks them two back. Donny and Teach speak a fragmented language that's also mud-stuck (their goal is "the thing"), and in act 2, if they weren't planning theft and possibly murder, you'd swear they were Abbott and Costello asking "Who's on first?" Buffalo's been staged across the spectrum, from low comedy to junk-shop noir. For Compass Theatre, director Ruff Yeager wisely sticks to the present moment and lets the humor fall where it may. I caught a preview and, even with some rough spots, it had a stark, improvisational feel: Donny, Teach, and Bob plot, and compose Mamet's play, inch by inch as they go along.

Chad Jaeger packs his set, Don's basement-level junk shop, with rows of secondhand items. The set's realistic in great detail but looks too orderly for such a chaotic scene. Matt Scott had Teach's paranoia down, and his need for human contact, but went over the top vocally for his outbursts. As Bob, Don's gopher/protégé (and the only one who makes any money in the play), Nathan Dean Snyder's eyes, like a young dog's, searched for security in others'. Walter Murray's father Don provided a veneer of stability, though underneath he's trapped in a vertiginous world where business is war by other means and value has become destabilized.

#### Doubt

John Patrick Shanley says ours is a "courtroom culture," where everything gets debated, bluster trumps reason, and "communication has become a contest of wills." Instead of offering that culture's certainty, Shanley shaped a play for its opposite. Doubt, which he says can be a

"passionate exercise," is its title and its outcome. It's 1964, roughly a year after JFK. Father Brendan Flynn subscribes to Vatican II. He's taken the school's first black student, Donald Muller, under his wing. Sister Aloysius Beauvier, the principal, is spare-not-the-rod old school. She's convinced Flynn performed a sexual "infringement" with Mueller. Her evidence: hearsay and stereotypes. For the San Diego Rep, Douglas Roberts walks kindly Father Flynn on a tightrope: Does he become paranoid because he's been caught or because a falsehood could cost him his beloved calling? Innocent Sister James wants life to remain simple; Amanda Sitton traces Sister's almost speechless disillusionment with eloquence. In a brief, explosive cameo, Monique Gaffney plays Donald Muller's mother, who's fighting a battle that comfy goods and evils can't encompass. Rosina Reynolds makes Sister Aloysius unvielding but shows she's trapped in a larger, even more authoritarian system. Sister seems monstrous, true, but she must be since she's also the underdog.

#### The Dresser

In his youth, playwright Ronald Harwood served as dresser for Sir Donald Wolfit, a British actor who performed mostly in the provinces ("Olivier was a tour de force," went a joke, "Wolfit was forced to tour"). Harwood's experiences shape one of

the theater's most moving celebrations of the craft. Sir, a Wolfit-like actor, is old, frayed, and has one of the most demanding jobs in the world (he played Othello last night; tonight, his 227th King Lear; tomorrow, Richard III). When the play begins, in England during the 1942 Blitz, sirens blare, and Sir can't remember where he's been, let alone his lines. As bombs fall, his dresser of 16 years, Norman, practices *his* craft with pep talks, cajoling, whatever it takes. Norman's at once a doctor, nurse, psychiatrist, docent, and slave. Even so, it's doubtful he can revive such a "spent force." Somehow Sir dons the King's ancient makeup and great red robe - a process fascinating to watch — and revives.

Throughout, *The Dresser* resembles reading James Boswell on Dr. Johnson. You watch two artists at work, two halves of a much larger artistic whole. This sense also applies to the performances of Jonathan Mc-Murtry, as Sir, and Sean Sullivan, as Norman, in the North Coast Rep's terrific production. Individually, each is excellent — McMurtry's Sir broken down for having to carry


"the whole bloody universe" as Lear; Sullivan, never better, as the selfless servant, astonishingly devoted, brutally underappreciated. Combined, their interplay is a wonder. The David Ellenstein-directed cast has no weak links. And Marty Burnett's brick-walled, earth-tone set moves from the green room to backstage, it seems, in the blink of an eye. *Critic's pick.*

#### Love Song

John Kolvenbach's becoming a player's playwright. He crafts scenes that often resemble a threering circus. In his *Love Song*, for example, he juggles actors with rapidfire dialogue and makes things balloon: a simple multiple-choice personality test, for example, when taken at face value expands into life-and-death issues. Harry, wife Joan, and her withdrawn brother Beane live literal lives. Everything is

what it is (and, to bullish Joan's way of thinking, barely that). But when Molly, an unexpected intruder, attempts to rob Beane's apartment (which is as empty as his heart), light bulbs click above the trio's heads: romance blooms and re-blooms, a melon inspires, and the world becomes chocked with poetry, for a while. If you don't count its critique of lives so vapid they can only thrive on fantasy — Harry and Joan don't even know how to play hookey, for criminey's sake! — the play's a fragile whimsy. The Cygnet Theatre production, directed by Sean Murray, however, is a hoot. A quartet of actors tear into their roles, relishing Kovenbach's zany lines and daffy business (and performing with stopwatch precision at that). Francis Gercke makes Beane an Ugly Duckling: after having been mute for years, he suddenly swans and can't stop talking or appreciating (or evoking laughter). Daren Scott, as Harry, and Jessa Watson, as Joan, showcase their comic gifts as a couple so repressed that, when they open up, find themselves in undis-

covered territory. Jessica John, who also designed the apt costumes, makes Molly a nifty hybrid: an impish recidivist.

#### The Misanthrope

'Wouldn't the social fabric come undone if we were wholly frank with evervone?" In Molière's masterful comedy, Alceste hates flattery and

flatterers, which means, in his era, most everyone. He wants to change the world from fawning hypocrisy to 'sincerity in excess." This most rational of males, however, is smack dab in love with Celimene, who banquets on compliments from an armada of admirers. She's the opposite of Alceste - or is she? When push slams into shove, Celimene unleashes a Tourette's syndrome-screed that indicts everyone. In UCSD Theatre's curriculum, The Misanthrope fulfills the requirement of actors doing a verse play. But with James Winker's excellent direction, except for the occasional obvious couplet, vou'd never know it. Winker's wellspoken cast fills the poetic translation (Richard Wilbur's?) with passion and wit. Third-year MFA Joel Gelman's a marvel as Alceste: he's stark, raving sane. Talented Cate

Campbell, first-year MFA, gives Celimene coy, controlling behavior, until she flips her switch and goes lights out. The supporting cast — especially Josh Wade's Philinte and Patrick Riley's decadent Acaste has no weak links. Nor does the design work (especially Christine Crook's period-eclectic costumes, including a sporty pink waist bow for Celimene). Thomas George's gold-streaked set cuts out about a third of the Mandell Weiss Forum's seats, which makes for intimacy with Molière's passel of ardent hypocrites. Worth a try.

#### Six Degrees of Separation

John Guare based his play with the famous title on an actual event. A young black man pretending to be Sidney Poitier's son (Poitier had none) entered homes he couldn't have otherwise and robbed them. In the play, Paul may not be who he says, but he's a good enough actor to convince upscale New Yorkers Flan and Ouisa Kittredge to allow him into their art-rich Upper East Side apartment. A bonding spiritual breakthrough with Ouisa and Paul's naked male lover scurrying about make for connections and separations. At the Old Globe, even when you know Paul's a fraud, Samuel Stricken makes you wonder if Poitier had an illegitimate son. Stricken handles Guare's lectures (about the imagination, drama's emotionally "paralyzed" characters, etc.) without becoming too preachy - no mean feat - and his best work comes when the real Paul peeks through the mask and realizes he can only gain acceptance as someone else. Guare said Six Degrees should move like the wind. Though his early scenes threaten to crack the sound barrier, director Trip Cullman shows a good sense of the play's collagelike form and how to bring the script's 17 characters (most of them cameos and some of contemporary theater's more alienated beings) to life. Thomas Jay Ryan gives Flan the reality-avoidance instincts of an ostrich, to comic effect. Wearing Emily Rebholz's color-burst costumes, Karen Ziemba's terrific as Ouisa. As her understanding grows, Ziemba traces a touching arc from wide-eved daffy to near-tragic awareness.





igwedge couple of years ago the company changed my computer login to a series of numbers instead of my name; I should have realized the foreshadowing. Local news viewership is down and advertisers cut their budgets, so







· Freud de Melo, 73, operates a quirky tourist park in central Brazil that features stone models of Noah's Ark and other sculptures, but he also suffers from taphephobia, the fear of being buried alive. One of his sculptures is his crypt. His vault houses a TV and fruit pantry, has access to fresh air, and features two built-in plastic cones that act as megaphones to the outside, reassuring de Melo that if he is buried too soon, he will be able to protest. In October, he demonstrated for a Wall Street Journal reporter, screaming, "Help me! Come quick! I've been buried alive!

#### **Government in Action!**

A Houston Chronicle investigation revealed in November that Immigration and Customs Enforcement failed to detain 75 percent of all self-identified illegal aliens convicted of local crimes in the Houston area recently, including immigrants who had committed felonies such as sexual assault of a child and even capital murder. After ICE declined to hold them, that 75 percent were released back into the community. Nationally, during that same approximate time period, ICE was deporting twice as many illegal

aliens with clean records (clean, except for being undocumented) as those with criminal rap sheets. - Environmental activists announced in November the intention to sue the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for reducing by 80 percent the California sanctuary area of the endangered San Bernardino kangaroo rat (distinguishing feature: only four toes on its hind feet). In Britain, however, the Ministry of Defense has shown great sensitivity to bats that were living in antiquated military housing in two Hampshire facilities. Remodeled buildings for 18,000 personnel will include cavities that serve as bat habitats.

Said a spokesman, "If we didn't do it and people were falling off ladders, we would be criticized."

#### **Fine Points of the Law**

(1) By a 2-1 vote, a Florida appeals court ruled in December that Andrew Craissati could stop paying alimony to his ex-wife. The couple's agreement called for alimony only until she remarried or was "cohabit[ing]" with another person for at least three months, and Craissati pointed out that his ex-wife, recently convicted

of a serious DUI offense, is now "cohabiting" with a cellmate in prison. (2) In November, a judge at Killorglin District Court in Kerry, Ireland, dismissed two DUI cases because the blood-alcohol readings were not administered properly. The suspects should have been isolated for 20 minutes before the test but had been permitted to use urinals, and the judge accepted lawyers' arguments that "steam" from the urine might have wafted into the men's noses and raised their readings.



"For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord," read Dwain Bostic at the outset. "Plans to prosper you and not harm you. Plans to give you hope and a future."

Hearing that, I might have readied myself for some Prosperity Gospel. But Bostic wasn't finished. "We can have boundless hope," he offered. "This doesn't mean we will be spared pain, suffering, or hardship, but that God will see us through to a glorious conclusion."

The theme for Sunday's service (as it had been for the previous three weeks) was the

charmingly bleak "You Don't Have What It Takes." Specifically, you can't please everybody, you can't handle everything, you can't be good enough, and you can't control the future.

That was the content; the theme for the form might have been, "Oh, this old thing?" Again and again, I was struck by the sense of elements lovingly labored over, then presented so casually as to almost escape notice. The tight guitar-and-drum work from the band, its setup plunked down at the foot of the stage. The goofy appeal of the video before the sermon (unlike the fortune teller at the carnival, you don't know what the future holds). "All You Need Is Love" running under Paul's famous meditation from Corinthians — "Love is patient, love is kind..." as a lead-in to Lent, er, the church's 40 Days of Love, beginning February 22. (Why do I mention Lent? It's not just the timing. A couple of other old-time-y liturgical elements popped up, including a group recitation of the Our Father before communion.)

All participants in the 40 Days were challenged to attend worship for six weeks straight, attend a home Life Group for six weeks, read a devotional daily, and, according to Annette Link, "have action. When we learn about God's love, then it helps us to love those around us, which is the commandment." She asked for truck owners to volunteer on Saturday to bring food down to Mexico. "You know — know God, serve God."

The band had been hinting at the hard-times-a-comin' theme — "Rich or poor/ God I want You more"—and they cemented it by adding a chorus to Ecclesiastes's reminders of a time to mourn, weep, die, etc. "For everything, there is a reason/ For everything, there is a rhyme/ For everything there is a season/ For everything, there is a time." Just now, said Pastor John Rose, it was a time to have faith in the face of the economic tidal wave.

Rose took the story of Abram's calling as a model

of faith. "Abram is being called by God into an uncertain future, being asked to leave behind what is familiar, what is comfortable, what is affluent, and to step into a future that is unknown." Sort of like folks facing foreclosure and unemployment today.

"We don't have the ability to control the future, but we do have some choices we can make.... You can choose to move faith-forward, regardless of circumstances." Abram "believed in what God was calling him to - listen to me — even though he had no idea what God was doing.... I don't know what tomorrow holds, but I know Who holds tomorrow. This latest round of news is nothing really new — all of life is uncertain, isn't it? But I choose to live my life in the simple belief that God holds tomorrow and that I can trust Him."

Second choice: "I choose to walk away from the idols of my past." Rose cited addictions and sins, but also houses and security, and suggested that "God ripping away the idols might be the best thing

that ever happened to you." He quoted Jonah: "Those who cling to useless idols forfeit the grace that could be theirs." God is asking, "Are you ready to surrender those idols?"

Extraordinary

Third choice: "I choose to live by faith and by God's truth.... How are you feeling about the American prom-

ise and dream of prosperity today? Things we...held as absolute truths are crumbling all around us. God and God alone is true through all these failures."

The Big Point: We can't control our lives. "Even tomorrow is not promised to you!" marveled Rose. "What's funny is that we get really focused on plans we have no control over, and the one thing we have control over — whether or not we spend eternity in God's presence — that's the one choice we ignore."

What happens when we

"God finalizes the choices we made in life," said Rose, referencing C.S. Lewis. "If we choose to accept the work of Jesus on the cross, we are entered into heaven, as Scripture promises. If we choose to reject that, we have chosen to be away from God's presence, and that is called hell."




