

Straight shooting The Navy is preparing to resume live fire near the sands of Coronado after the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers signed off last month on a plan to establish a "naval danger zone" in the nearby Pacific, to be closed to the public during target practice. From 1959 through 2008, the Navy operated a "partially baffled Small Arms Range" near the ocean shore of the North Island portion of its Coronado Navy base, not far from the entrance to San Diego Bay, according to a recent notice of approval by the Corps.

The 12-lane pistol range and 10-lane rifle range, with targets backed by a 20-foot-high berm with 18-foot berms along the sides, operated 360 days a year and handled about 1000 military shooters each month. The facility was closed after a safety review by the Navy concluded that some kind of a system was needed to warn passersby of "dangers associated with possible munitions ricochets." Under the new plan, an area extending offshore about 4842 feet into the Pacific will be placed off-limits during firing.

> Three large red flags will warn mariners to stay out; at night, red lights at the top of the flagpoles will be

turned on. Not all of the 24 members of the public who sent comments were happy. "Several commenters stated the area in question has many uses of high priority to the maritime community, including yacht club races; bait hauling for sports fishing charters; recreational fishers; and lobster trapping," according to the notice. "The danger zone and nearby area are transited by many visitors on recreational boats throughout the day and night. Commenters stated that stray rounds so close to the entrance to San Diego Bay was 'absolutely unacceptable.' They also noted that vessels returning from Mexico would have no idea what the SAR warning flags along the shoreline indicate and may inadvertently travel through the danger zone."

More Buzz La Jolla financier and public affairs philanthropist R.B. "Buzz" Woolley

has teamed up with Netflix founder **Reed Hastings** in a high-dollar independent campaign on behalf of South Gate city clerk and ex-teacher **Carmen Avalos**, who is seeking election to the 50th state assembly seat being vacated by termed-out Democrat **Hector De La Torre**. On May 14, according to

state disclosure filings, Woolley gave \$30,000 to a com-

mittee called "Putting Schools First, sponsored by the Alliance of California Charter Schools." Last August 27, Hastings, of Los Gatos, contributed \$83,500 to the same group. On May 21 of this year, the committee spent \$11,628.34 in an independent expenditure on literature and mail for Avalos, who is also benefiting from sizable independent expenditures made by EdVoice, the lobbying and advocacy group cofounded by Hastings and Los Angeles billionaire Eli Broad, both of whom favor more charter schools, limits on public school teacher tenure, and other changes, including linking pay and teacher performance, opposed by the American Federation of Teachers and other public employee unions.

Woolley, the chief financial angel for the nonprofit online news site Voice of San Diego, where he is chairman and president of the board, according to IRS filings, has given \$318,750 to EdVoice during the past six years, records show. Woolley, Hastings, and Broad are also backers of Democratic state senator Gloria Romero's effort to become state superintendent of public instruction, another candidate opposed by teachers' unions. Romero favors streamlined authorization and renewal of charter schools and sponsored so-called Race to the Top legislation favored by EdVoice and GOP governor Arnold Schwarzenegger. On May 6, EdVoice reported contributing \$1,412,248 to Romero's cause County Democrats are getting big money from organized labor this year. Through May 22, the San Diego and Imperial Counties Labor Council has kicked in \$70,000. San Diego Fire Fighters Union Local 145 gave

\$12,000. Service Employees International Union Local 221 contributed \$18,000. Expenditures included \$22,939 on behalf of San Diego city council candidate **Howard Wayne** and \$12,175 to oppose county supervisor **Ron Roberts**.

Artist's rendering of proposed downtown Chargers stadium (on left)



The reason they're operational today still, and still have several more years to go, is because the operators of those landfills have gone to their municipalities and obtained extensions by increasing the elevation on which the landfill can operate. That's why we have a lot of Mount Trashmores around the county," Wick said. He believes that the county will need a new landfill by 2020 or 2025 and that it's best to plan ahead.

regarding landfills is the origin of the trash and the distance it's trucked. Would the East Otay Mesa landfill receive trash from outside San Diego County? "In fact," Wick said, "the focus is really on the trash of South Bay."

If Prop A passes, he said, "The next step for us is to analyze our options for how to obtain a permit. We need to make a decision if we're going to do that on our own or partner up with another landfill operator or a trash hauler in the area or a municipality." But when asked what municipality National Enterprises might partner with, rather than name a South Bay city, Wick responded the City of San Diego. The City of San Diego is obligated to pick up residential trash, Wick said. "Maybe there's a possible transaction there where we could save the City's general fund millions of dollars by

Mad Man

Ranter Causes Incident at Trolley Station

Chula Vista — On May 24, at around 9:30 a.m., police had to subdue a seemingly deranged man at the Palomar Street trollev station. He had attacked several people before the police were called. There were about 60

people at the station, including schoolchildren.

The man reportedly had launched into a tirade, screaming hoarse-voiced obscenities and frightening a group of 30 first-graders waiting to go on a school-sponsored trolley trip. Adult escorts kept the children away from the malcontent as he waved his arms and bellowed.

An MTS official and two rubber-gloved Chula Vista cops managed to approach the ranter and caiole him into handcuffs. Once cuffed and seated on a cement bench, the man pondered

police questioning and occasionally arose to spew epithets at curious onlookers.

Two more squad cars arrived, lights flashing, and two beefv officers approached the man in order to squire him off. The man did not appear drunk, but rather deeply disturbed, perhaps schizophrenic. Trains continued to function during the incident. By T.B. Beaudeau

Castaneda Clean

Mayoral Candidate Cleared of Charges Chula Vista — On May 25

at noon, city councilmember

and mayoral candidate Steve Castaneda called a press conference on the steps of city hall to announce his exoneration...again.

In 2006, the district attorney's office, acting on an anonymous tip, investigated Castaneda for allegedly trying to use his office as city councilmember to purchase a condo at a special rate. In 2008, a jury found him

innocent.

Then, in November 2009, Angel Castillo filed charges against **Castaneda for election** irregularities. Castillo said public records filed by Castaneda about his campaign finances helped him discover 83 cases of misconduct. However. Castillo never filed a records request with the city, which led Castaneda to conclude "that someone

fed Castillo the records." Julia Sylva was the outside attorney hired by the City to look into Castaneda's alleged violations. On the steps of city hall, Castaneda read from Sylva's findings: "It appears that the complainant [Castillo] is forum-shopping and that he filed the complaint to keep the allegations alive.... It is unfortunate that the complain-

ant chose to make serious allegations, which compelled the City to respond to what actually were frivolous allegations. The City expended $\stackrel{\mathrm{M}}{=}$ valuable resources to prove $\frac{D}{d}$ him wrong."

Valuable resources were a dominant theme at the press conference. Castaneda said the investigation will cost over \$25,000, and it comes continued on page 14



the urban center.... There is almost no evidence that professional sports franchises and facilities have a positive impact on real per capita income or employment, and may have a nega*tive effect.*"(Emphasis mine.)

The study went on to state the obvious: the City got completely fleeced when it negotiated its contracts with the Chargers. (Just think of all those who got publicly smeared for speaking the truth on that topic.)

But if you perused an account of the study in the local media, you might have concluded that the grand jury was touting that new Chargers stadium downtown. The media focused on

that \$17.1 million loss figure - suggesting that the grand jury bought into the Chargers' addled argument that it's better to pay a \$600 million to \$700 million subsidy for a new stadium than suffer an annual \$17.1 million loss. The team claims that the Qualcomm site could be developed and provide the City with income — a ridiculous assertion because there is a plume underneath it that will delay development for a long time, and there will be no market for development for the foreseeable future.

Chargers' bullhorn Mark Fabiani trumpets the downtown stadium as the "last, best option" for a new stadium - a veiled threat that should not be taken seriously. In this creditsqueezed economy, no new sports stadium is going to get built anytime soon, including in the Los Angeles environs.

But as soon as the grand jury report came out, the media began beating the drums. "Get it built," blared the Union-Tribune's editorial board. It is "time for city, Chargers to commit to each other." The U-T sang the praises of development in the ballpark district unaware, or unwilling to admit, that the condos and hotels there have very few people occupying them.

Chargers stadium happen," exhorted one Lee "Hacksaw" Hamilton, resident scholar of San Diego News Network, which has essentially shut down. The new stadium "might be of tremendous value to the downtown area," quoth he, contradicting the grand jury's statement. He even made an economic projection: "The value of land at the Q and the Sports Arena will rise as Wall Street rises." (Italics mine.) Oh? Are you sure, Hacksaw? Stocks are about where they were in 1999. Real estate values have plummeted.

On May 24, KPBS's Maureen Cavanaugh, on the program These Days, hosted Fabiani and Liam Dillon of Voice of San Diego. Fabiani put his foot neatly in his own mouth. San Diego "has a very bad deal right now at the Qualcomm site," he said. Yeah, and with whom did the City make that very bad deal? With the Chargers, who now want another deal. ("Fool me once, shame on..." Oh, you know how that goes.)

on Fabiani's blooper. "If the City keeps making bad deals with the Chargers - who's to say that this time the City is going to make a good deal with the Chargers?" asked Dillon astutely. But later, he seemed to be buying into the Chargers' fatuous argument. Perhaps by building a new stadium, the City could save in the long run. "Basically, you're already subsidizing billionaires, here's a way where you might be able to stop," said Dillon.

Cavanaugh should have asked him how the City is going to stop subsidizing billionaires if it will throw hundreds of millions at the downtown stadium. She didn't. And she should have asked the key question: what's wrong with repairing whatever is wrong with Qualcomm — if anything — since it's only used a few times a year? She didn't ask that, either. Encouragingly, those who called in, and most who initially commented on the discussion, realized what a swindle this proposed stadium is.

The media are not discussing the most important variable in this discussion. Late last year, the Citizens'

Force came out with an important study. "The City of San Diego's current fiscal outlook is very dire," it said. (It is no better now, and may be worse.) "The City has been 'living beyond its means' for a number of years, deferring important expenses and postponing or underfunding a number of obligations that must now be addressed (such as aging infrastructure, underfunded retirement plans, and unfunded retiree medical benefits).... The City raises the least General Fund Revenues per household, measured as a percentage of household income, of any of the ten largest cities in California."

Fiscal Sustainability Task

If it can't accomplish a number of reforms, "The City would be forced to consider seeking injunctive relief by filing for Chapter 9 Bankruptcy protection," said the task force, made up of establishment members.

But now the establishment (hopefully not the task force members) wants to hand a massive stadium subsidy to a family worth more than \$1 billion.

Maybe San Diego should be renamed Sportugal.

giving them a place to dispose of trash less expensive than the current contracts they have with current landfill operators."

Wick is no stranger to the problems associated with a landfill. A subsidiary of National Enterprises owns an old county landfill in National City, once known as the Duck Pond Landfill. The property was purchased, according to Wick, in 1997–98, long after the landfill had closed. After acquiring it through a foreclosure, Wick, along with the City of National City and the Community Development Commission of the continued on page 14

Goat Canyon Trestle Trek

Desert Hike to Railway **Engineering Marvel** Borrego Springs - Tucked away in the southern end of the Anza-Borrego Desert is an engineering marvel that, due to its remoteness, has only been viewed by a relatively small number of people.

The Goat Canyon trestle was built in 1932 after an earthquake collapsed one of the tunnels of the Carrizo Gorge section of the San **Diego and Arizona Railway.** At 200 feet tall and 750 feet long, it remains to this day the longest, tallest curved wooden trestle ever built in the United States.

The preferred route is to park near Mortero Palms and take the trail that leads you up and over the Jacumba Mountains, dropping you down into **Goat Canyon after three miles** or so. But I've always had it in the back of my mind to park at the north end of Carrizo Gorge and then hike up to where it intersects Goat Canvon. There is no clearly defined trail up the gorge, and a majority of the hike involves dodging cholla, hopscotching across river rocks, and squeezing through cat-claw. Still, I was itching to do it, and Mary agreed to accompany me.

A couple of miles into the hike, we realized we were not covering as much ground as we had hoped. By our calculations, the Goat Canyon juncture was still a couple hours away, and the sun had already moved directly overhead. So we made the decision to bushwhack up the side of the mountain, using the train tracks as our goal. We made our way up the loose material, sweating, cursing, and dodging cholla until we finally arrived at the tracks of the Carrizo Gorge railway.

From here the hike was easy since we merely had to follow the tracks for about another mile and a half. Along the way we passed through two-story-tall tunnels that had been blasted out of solid rock and are supported with massive wooden beams. Further down the tracks we passed by some old boxcars perched on the edge of the gorge. After a bit more hiking, we found ourselves standing in the middle of the 200-foot-high Goat Canyon trestle.

Looking west, down into Goat Canyon, we realized the approach from Carrizo Gorge would have been all but impossible. There is a towering dry waterfall at the mouth of the continued on page 16

has drifted in and out of council chambers since partiers discovered a loophole in the city's beach-booze ban that allows them to crack open beers and other adult beverages while they float in rafts just offshore.

"I had not anticipated you would bring up the issue of floatillas quite this early, but we will certainly address that," said Captain Ball moments after taking his seat.

Committee member Tony Young waded in and asked what Ball thought about a future amendment that would also prohibit people from bringing unopened containers onto the beach.

"What I think about it? The floatillas create a challenge for us," responded Ball. "People [are] getting out in floats in 10 or 12 feet of water, and they are completely intoxicated.... There is a significant public safety issue."

Young then reminded the audience that this type of behavior was the reason why he did not support the ban. "People are going to find a way."

Village Grifters

Conning for Spare Change? East Village — During the past week, there have been reports of at least three grifters trying to talk their way into getting money from residents and merchants in the East Village.

Last weekend, a man described as a heavyset Hispanic male in his 30s or 40s was believed to have been impersonating a Vons employee while trying to obtain bus fare because his truck had allegedly broken down.

SD Transportation Plan Raises Concerns San Diego — On Tuesday evening, Heather Werdick, a transportation planner for San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), presented the agency's draft 2050 Regional Transportation Plan.

The upcoming 2050 Regional Transportation Plan will be released in July 2011 after SANDAG gets feedback from the public. The purpose of the plan is to develop a strategy for future publictransit projects throughout the county's urban areas.

By 2050 SANDAG forecasts an additional 1.2 million people will take up residence in the county, 400,000 new housing units will be built, and 500,000 new jobs will be created.

Werdick went on to explain some of the ideas for transportation in the coming decades. Most of the plans focused on mass transit: extended light rail lines, a new high-speed rail line from Riverside and Los Angeles counties ending at Lindbergh Field, and additional

bus transit lines around urban areas and transit corridors. During the presentation, little was mentioned about automobiles and freeways.

"I call this plan the bus, trolley, streetcar, and railroad plan. It is not a transportation plan," said Guy Preuss, chair of the Skyline-Paradise Hills planning group. "It's quite obvious that there's a need for a third freeway between [Interstate 5] and [Interstate 15]. Why highways aren't on the table when you're talking about transportation is beyond me. [SANDAG] is developing a plan where the communities have to support transportation."

"Automobiles will be the major transportation mode in the future," said Community Planning Committee chair Leo Wilson. "You're not going to go to IKEA to buy a table or a lamp on a bus. It won't happen."

Swamp Thing

Robber Hides in Drainage Ditch, Caught Later Carlsbad — On May 25, a loss-prevention agent at the Marshall's store on Marron Road confronted a 41-year-old Hispanic male suspect after he clipped security sensors with wire cutters and concealed merchandise on his person.

According to police, the agent was pushed by the suspect and threatened with a rock that the suspect had grabbed while running into nearby heavy vegetation. Police responded with a search by air and canines, which lasted an hour but was unsuccessful.

"It's a drainage ditch that runs south of Highway 78," said Lt. Paul Mendes of the Carlsbad Police Department. "It's very thick, and there's a good amount of standing water where you could submerge yourself completely."

Still Shaken

Aftershocks, Quake Damage Widespread Imperial Valley — Though not on the front page of the news anymore, aftershocks subsequent to the 7.2-magnitude earthquake that occurred on April 4 in the Imperial Valley continue. A 4.9 quake shook as recently as May 22 and was felt in parts of San Diego County.

Also not reported much in the news is the continuing economic impact to the valley. Maritza, who manages the Benavidez Traffic School in Imperial, said attendance in her classes is way down since the April quake. "A lot of people are still scared and freaked out," she said.

Most press reports at the time focused on damages in the border town of Calexico and in the neighboring Baja town of Mexicali. Yet, damage was extensive in the larger towns to the north, in El Centro and Brawley.

Over at the Church of Religious Science near downtown El Centro, church administrator Randy Connor says no one is out spending money because they are using it to fix damages. "Two of our neighboring churches were red-flagged, one lost their steeple, and the other will need to be demolished."

The article tells of two employees who were fired because they "refused to erase public records." But there is more evidence of Sanders's heavy-handedness against honest employees. Don Bauder's article ("Too Much Conflict, Too Much Interest," "City Lights," March 4) about Economic Development director Scott Kessler being fired for cooperating with the FBI and the police included a link to Kessler's lawsuit (Kessler is suing the City). Below is an excerpt from the suit.

"Thereafter, Plaintiff informed Deputy Chief Anderson of his exchange with Laurie Davis. Deputy Chief Anderson advised Plaintiff that he should not have cooperated with the Ethics Commission without prior approval from Mayor Sanders' office. Deputy Chief Anderson



also informed Plaintiff that he would need to report Plaintiff to Mayor Sanders' office. Plaintiff informed Deputy Chief Anderson that he had also spoken with the Ethics Commission on previous occasions.

"On or about October 16, 2008, Plaintiff received a telephone call from Assistant Deputy Chief Murray. Assistant Deputy Chief Murray told Plaintiff that, 'all hell had broken loose in the Mayor's office, and that people were upset with [Plaintiff], including the Mayor himself, and that [Plaintiff] should lay low for awhile.' Assistant Deputy Chief Murray directed Plaintiff to discontinue any communications with Detective Vile and Agent Cook, and to further turn over all copies of Detective Vile and Agent Cook's investigative report to Chief Operating Officer Goldstone immediately.

"Assistant Deputy Chief Murray informed Plaintiff that his cooperation with Detective Vile and Agent Cook into the investigation of LiMandri, combined with his cooperation with the Ethics Commission, angered Chief of Staff Michell, and Legislative Director Dubick."



Two Weeks in June



Tiger's swing coach Hank Haney quit the unquittable job.

he Tiger Woods story has turned interesting again, which, given the attention span of news consumers, is remarkable. In fact, you could argue Woods's story has gone on so long, has been renewed so many times, that it's well on its way to the golden sanctum sanctorum that shelters the story of O.J.

It looks like Tiger's story is coming up to another plot point - next week's U.S. Open as possible personal event horizon, this week's Memorial Tournament (fittingly Jack Nicklaus's tournament) as lead-in.

One wonders, how are things in Tiger World? Well, it's never good for the meanest stud on the block to realize nobody's afraid of him anymore. To wit: things are so bad with Tiger that competitors are getting uppity. U.S. Ryder Cup captain Corey Pavin says Woods has to earn his spot on the team. Jack Nicklaus (18 major wins) says Tiger needs to win a major this year. Even the spineless sporting media has felt safe enough to criticize Woods for swearing on the golf course.

More ominously, Hank Haney, his swing coach, quit. Quit, not fired. Since being Tiger's swing coach means fame, and fame means money, two items not associated with swing coaches, the fact that Haney quit indicates something else is going on. Nobody quits that job. My guess is Haney saw something coming and didn't want to be in the same sentence as Woods when it hit.

Woods returned to human form last year at the 2009 PGA Championship, when he had a two-stroke lead going into the final round and wound up losing by three stokes to Yang Yong-eun. Tiger had never lost a major tournament when going into the final round with a lead. His first loss was to the aforementioned Young-eun, who was 37 years old, on the 2009 tour by way of qualifying school, and ranked 110 in the world. To

my eyes, Woods folded, a plain vanilla choke. Woods caved under pressure, bogied the last two holes like he'd seen so many other golfers do when he was making a charge.

That was less than ten months ago. Premeltdown.

I thought it was stark arrogance for Tiger to mark his return at the Masters. But, he finished tied for fourth, which, after the galactic shitstorm he's been living in, was amazing in an inhuman sort of way. Then, he missed the cut at Quail Hollow Championship and then withdrew, ten shots behind the leader, from the Players Championship.

Now he's set to start the Memorial Tournament on Thursday and the Open one week later. Suddenly, Tiger's got more riding on the next two weeks than one would have thought possible as the Georgia sun set on April 11.

So far he's avoided the worst. There has been no creditable story about his nonstandard sex. No books, no video of Tiger drooling on a bar stool, no criminal charges, just stories about Tiger fucking countless women. It's not pretty, but he'll still be able to walk within 500 yards of an elementary school.

Reports indicate that Woods is already out \$100 million due to lost sponsors, hush money, flunkies, lawyers, and lawyer-flunkies. Soon, \$100 million will seem like the good old days.

Media reports say wife Elin Nordegren will file for divorce in Sweden, in California, or in New York. Apparently, she's asking for \$750 million and custody of the kids. Apparently, Tiger wants her to sign a lifetime "confidentiality clause."

Considering the past six months, I can fairly say Woods is not a person who wilts from too much publicity. Rather, Woods is acting like a person who has done things that are worth the expenditure of hundreds of millions of dollars to keep quiet.

Then there are steroids. Some media outlets have published Barry Bonds-like photos of Tiger Woods at the age of 18, 25, 30, and 33. The changes in his body are alarming. There is the Canadian doctor who made five home visits to Mr. Woods. Dr. Anthony Galea is charged in Canada with selling an unapproved drug, conspiracy to import an unapproved drug, and is charged in the U.S. for lying to federal officials, smuggling, and unlawful distribution of HGH. Woods has not been implicated in any of this, although I should add that the trials, testimony, and plea deals are yet to come. Finally, there is his knee. People forget he's had four left-knee operations.

Which is why the Memorial and the U.S. Open are vital. All is forgiven if he plays like Tiger. If he becomes a normal golfer — much less a poor golfer fighting to make the cut every week — he'll get another taste of how quickly and violently the world can turn.

The man needs a large Father's Day gift. He's been pouring his energy into his work, fixing our bathroom, gardening, playing kickball with the kids, and performing lots of loving acts of service for his tired wife Eve. I'm thinking of sending Pat off on a brewery tour with some other well-deserving dads.

Brew Hop specializes in custom and private brewery tours throughout San Diego (858-361-8457). "We run tours for groups as small as 2 people, up to 40 peo-

ple," explained cofounder Summer Nixon. "We work directly with all of our guests with exactly where they want to visit or recommend solutions based on their favorite styles of beer. All of our vehicles are luxury limousine-style vehicles, usually six-footplus ceilings, iPod hookups, and they have all been permitted so you can

enjoy adult beverages on the road." This was sounding like Pat's kind of party

already.

"We have some of the top breweries in the country here right now, if not in the world," Nixon continued. "Stone Brewing Company is world-renowned. Ballast Point just took home a huge award at the World Beer Cup; they won champion small brewery in April.

AleSmith is also world renowned, as is Lost Abbey. Men's Journal ranked us the number-one beer city in the country last October. Beer tourism is up."

Brew Hop will pick up clients in San Diego County, though they have picked up as far away as Temecula. "Most parties will pick one location to meet at. You don't want to be wasting your tour time traveling around picking people up....

"A lot of people like our 'Beer Tasters' tour, which is a two-and-a-half-hour tour, visiting one or two breweries; that one is \$95 per person, and it's all-inclusive. So, it's transportation down to gratuities for your bar staff, all your beer, and your tours arranged for each location. A slightly better value is our five-hour tour, which comes in at \$139 per person. So, for just a little more, you get twice the time and you can easily visit three to four breweries."

Military, active or retired, get a 10 percent discount for their whole group.

"Our most popular breweries tend to be the world-renowned ones...but with every group, every palate is different. So, every

person gets to have that 'aha' moment of 'I love this. I can't believe this is here. I drive by this on the way to work."

When pressed to name an interesting but lesser-known local beer, Nixon suggested Speedway Stout. "It's pretty special. No one really expects amazing stouts out of San

Diego, and it is this wonderful coffeeinfused stout out of AleSmith. And that usually surprises people. It is 12 percent alcohol, so share it with a friend. Because of the caffeine, you will be wide awake and ready to roll

"I would say one of my favorites is a beer called Nelson, from Alpine Brewing," replied John McDermott, co-owner of Brewery Tours of San Diego (619-961-7999). "It's a rye India pale ale."

Two people touring three breweries in five hours with Brewery Tours runs "about \$150 a person," McDermott says. "If it was up to 20 people, it would be about \$75 a person. We also have packages that include just two breweries and don't include food, and if you had a group of 20 people, it is around \$40 per person....

"We give you one formal tour, show you what all the equipment does, show you where they make the beer,

then there are plenty of samples for your tasting at each brewery. I go over some different history for the brewery."

Brewery Tours of San Diego uses 20-passenger buses or a 9-passenger van. "Mainly we pick up from

downtown, Mission Valley, and beaches. If you are out of this area, give us a call and we will see if it works, or we can set something up to make it work for you."

Brewery Tours offers tours on Monday through Friday to Ballast Point, Stone Brewing, and San Diego Brewing Company (where lunch is served) for \$85 a person. On Saturday, their public tour brings you to Green Flash, Backstreet Brewery, and Lost Abbey for \$85 a person. Lunch is served at Lost Abbey. On Sundays, the tour goes to Stone, Lost Abbey, and San Marcos Brewery (lunch) for \$85. These tours, McDermott says, may not necessarily be private.










Ginger Wolbers and Frank Bass

Till death do us part. It's the only way we will.

When Ginger Bass filed for divorce from her husband Frank in November 2007, she hoped he would not contest the dissolution. She offered to buy out his interest in their Lakeside home so both could move on. For months, Frank stayed in their home. It wasn't until the following April that he left and roomed with a buddy, who, after three days, asked him to go. Frank moved into a cheap motel, but he said it was "killing" him. Soon he was back, pleading with Ginger not to divorce him. He broke down and cried like a baby. He said he'd change. He said he was depressed and couldn't live without her. He told her he wanted to return to their first love, trapshooting, which had brought them into marriage eight years before. And he said he was sorry about the other women. He promised that phase was over.

But if there was one thing that stuck in Ginger's craw, it was the women. She was so embarrassed by his cheating — and his roughing her up when she complained about it — that very few friends or family members knew. Into the first several months of 2008, while their divorce proceeded, Frank was still

in the Lakeside house, forcing her to have sex with him and believing this would win her back. As often as he got his way, Ginger got hers, which was to fight him off and flee the house.

Friends and family of Ginger Bass, who was 51 in 2008, describe her as a talented and independent woman. (No family members I contacted agreed to be interviewed, though some of their comments have appeared in other publications; several friends of Ginger's and Frank's did speak to me but on condition of anonymity.) One friend said Ginger could "do anything." For 20 years, she lived in Alaska with her first husband. They adopted three siblings from Bogotá, Colombia. Ginger was a truck driver in Alaska during the construction of the pipeline. Her father, Kenneth "Rusty" Wolbers, who owned a large trucking company in California, had taught her to drive an 18-wheeler. Later, she designed and built two

log cabins and worked with stained glass in her own business.

In 1996, after a divorce, Ginger moved to San Diego, and she became a real estate broker. Ten years later she was managing the Re/ Max Associates branch in La Mesa.

In her business-card photo, Ginger exudes the sanguine vitality of a woman in love with the outdoors. She has medium-length straight brown hair showing a few traces of gray, a Cheshire grin, and smoky eyes (the blue eyeliner was tattooed on). She had one tattoo on her thigh, a multicolored flair of flowers. Ginger, who was 5 feet 8 and weighed 160 pounds, was "very fit, worked out a lot," said a friend. Another called her "beautiful-model material."

Frank Bass, a year older than Ginger, was 6 feet 6 and about 185 pounds, with hazel eyes and brown hair. He was a machinist and handyman. A fellow machinist wrote on a website, "I used to work with Frank and he was a really nice guy. He was even tempered and always great to be around." Frank was "a lot of fun," said another pal. He shot a "mean horseshoe." One friend recalled him as "a normal-looking guy, a typical machinist, really kind of quiet." His personality, though, could be "dark and standoffish. Like a lot of machinists, he was a perfectionist." Other buddies noted Frank's "short fuse. We all knew Frank was a little off."

Everybody liked Frank, said another, but he wasn't "very warm with people."

From 1982 to 1998, Frank was married to a woman named Vanessa. They had two children, Frank Jr., who works locally in corrections, and Erica, a La Mesa real estate agent. The divorce, on grounds of "irreconcilable differences," was uncontested. But according to friends, Frank's threats forced Vanessa to flee. She gave Frank the house and the kids. Still. Frank didn't



like being left: on the day their divorce was final, he allegedly told her that he was "going to get her." The woman disappeared for a couple of years.

In 1999, Frank met Ginger when he was buying a home in Lakeside at 14038 Cheryl Lee Court, a quarter mile from the I-8 exit at Lake Jennings Park Road. As his agent, she brokered the deal. They discovered a love for the outdoors, biking, hiking, and trapshooting. Taught by her father Rusty, an Amateur Trapshooting Association senior champion, Ginger was an expert shot. She got Frank interested in the sport, and soon the couple had matching 12-gauge shotguns. They married not long after they met.

"They seemed like a strange pair," said a man who shot with them and with Ginger's father. "Ginger was outgoing, a people person. Frank wasn't. It struck me as funny that they even got together because they were kind of opposite personalities." Another friend disagreed, saying that early on, "They were pretty much happy, pretty much taken with each other." They looked like the "ideal couple. They were fairly young,

attractive, successful in their careers. They both liked shooting, going to the desert." And it was clear that Frank's kids "loved Ginger and she liked them."

Since his early 20s, Frank had worked at Chem-tronics, an aerospace company in El Cajon. One work pal said he was always "professional and took his work very seriously." He rose to the position of floor supervisor. But then, in 2006, he was laid off. Rather than mope, Frank decided to take it easy for a year and not work. Eventually, he and Ginger started a home-refurbishing business that used her resources at Re/Max.

Bass Homes and Estates specialized in fixing up foreclosures and selling them for profit.

Behind the business front, their marriage was deteriorating. As early as 2004, Frank was sneaking off with women, one, a floor supervisor at Chemtronics. Sometime in 2007, while Frank was tending to foreclosed properties, he met a woman, a renter in a home he intended to flip, and began a new affair. What's more, Frank was picked up by police while soliciting a prostitute on El Cajon Boulevard.

He was also beating up on Ginger. The abuse happened when he was

drinking. Friends who came over to the Basses' to throw horseshoes noticed Frank's volatility and Ginger's bruises. Said one friend, Ginger periodically gave Frank an ultimatum: stop drinking and stop roughing her up or else she'd end the marriage. For a while, he would. And Ginger would tell concerned friends "he's changed." Divorced once, she'd say, "I really want to make it work." But nothing, not even Ginger's forgiveness, could alter his nature. Said a longtime buddy, Frank was into three things: "Frank, making money, and getting laid." And more

2008 email that Ginger "asked me years ago to have him move out and move on." He was still there after Ginger filed for divorce. Frank told his son that it "just might be a little bit better if he had his own place, soon — like real soon."


Ginger wanted Frank Jr. out so her daughter Carolina, Carolina's husband Charles Carstensen, and their child could stay with them. Frank described Carolina and her husband as "developmentally delayed," a fact confirmed by several of the Basses' friends. With Frank Jr. gone, Frank and Ginger bought a small motor home and moved it onto the property for the Carstensens to live in. Then Erica Bass moved into the spare bedroom in the house.

threatened to kill himself. He walked over to an electrical socket in the garage and said, 'Come here. Do you want to see how easy it would be for me to kill myself?' I refused and left the house.

"I got in my car and tried to call a friend who is a former deputy sheriff but I was unable

to get a hold of him, so I called 911. The police met me and escorted me to a SART [sexual assault response team] examin[ation], where I met with a detective. The detective issued me an emergency protective order."

The court served a restraining order on Frank. It stipulated that he had to stav 100 yards away from Ginger, whether at her home, her job, or in her vehicle, for the next six months. He must not "harass, attack, strike, threaten, assault (sexually or otherwise), hit, follow, stalk, molest, destroy personal property, disturb the peace, keep under

surveillance, or block movements." He was forbidden to have any direct or indirect contact with her via phone, mail, or email. And he could not contact any of Ginger's "family members, caretakers, or guardians" to get information about her. Frank "must go to and pay for a 52-week batterer intervention program and show written proof of completion to the court."

Rusty Wolbers, retired from the trucking business and living in Reno, Nevada, had heard from Ginger about the alleged rape. He learned that Frank had attempted to clean up the marks of his assault, dressing her to "appear as if it were consensual sex." Wolbers said that his daughter told him, "Dad, he would have killed me."

Frank's lawyer, James Albert, disputed one element of the restraining order. He said that Frank was "losing money" because, as his "application to rescind the move-out order" states, "I cannot get all the equipment and supplies" from the Lakeside home "necessary to perform my job for my clients." His lawyer further argued that Ginger should "stay away from the residence until such time as the restraining order action is resolved."

Ginger did not move out. She did agree that Frank could retrieve "personal items with law enforcement or with a mutually agreed-upon third party or may send third party to retrieve them." She wanted it done "in one pick-up." She also admitted to the court

that "I let the respondent [Frank] live with me" during the sixmonth dissolution. He "will have to find another place to live. It is my home. I do not have another place to go."

For much of their marriage, Ginger and Frank were members of the Lemon Grove Rod and Gun Club. Shooting together, they scored quite high, often side by side, in interclub tournaments. In 2004, Frank finished 24th and Ginger 29th. In 2006, Frank was 1st and Ginger 2nd.

One friend recalls shooting regularly with the Basses. They were part of a league of shooters at P2K, a shooting range in El Cajon. He says the two were "inseparable," "an admirably complete couple." They shot matching guns and owned the same equipment. "Frank reloaded all their shells for them

What may have been tougher for Frank than Ginger was the requirement in the restraining order that both had to give up their guns. Ginger's lawyer, J.R. Givens, told me that "when the police came" to serve the order on May 12, "they confiscated all the guns." Frank signed the document "Firearms Turned In or Sold." He wrote, "I do not possess any firearms."



claiming it wasn't true. but she was also angry that Ginger had called social services. Part of Carolina's anger may have been occasioned by Ginger's choice of Teal Collins-Zee, her sister, to be the executor of her trust. (Collins-Zee is a member of the Mother Truckers rock band.) Apparently, Carolina was excluded from any assets in Ginger's estate.

Around the middle of May, Ginger's father, Rusty Wolbers, and his wife arrived on the day Frank showed up to remove his tools and equipment. Wolbers kept Frank from taking things in the garage that belonged to Ginger.

Ginger's growing dread was corrobo-


rated by Erica, Frank's daughter, who worked with Ginger at Re/ Max and was living at the Lakeside house. The two, read one court document, had a "very close relationship...despite the failed marriage." Erica told Ginger's mother that Frank had been harassing Ginger "relentlessly since the rape and the restraining order."

Ginger then did something extraordinary, according to her lawyer, Givens. In the week before the divorce was final, she asked him to get her guns back. "I said to her, 'I don't like guns. I'm not a big gun fan. And I'm not comfortable doing this. If you want me to do it, I'll do it. But I'm concerned.' "She said, 'No, no. He's been pretty good lately. I'll be fine. I'll keep them locked up."

Against his better judgment, Givens said he got the guns released. Among them were Ginger's guns, at least one gun a gift from her father, and Frank's guns, which the restraining order prohibited Frank from possessing. Givens remembered that the guns came back into her home "either the Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday" of the last week of May. That Wednesday was the divorce date. Givens told Ginger to call him when she had the guns in her home and they were secured. She did, he said. "She said they were safe."

According to a trapshooter who knew Ginger's gun habits, the Basses had many shotguns, several 12-gauge and at least one .410 Beretta. They kept their guns locked either in their carrying cases, where they were stored disassembled, or in a glass long-gun cabinet in the bedroom closet.

During all this May chaos, guns removed and guns returned, and while Ginger was trying to quit smoking she was taking Bupropion, a prescription medication for smoking cessation and for treating depression — Wednesday, May 28, came and went, and the Basses were at last divorced.

The split final, Ginger, who had bor-

rowed a loaded handgun and kept it in a drawer beside her bed, gave the weapon back to its owner. In its place she had her guns in the house, which may have given her some peace of mind. She allowed herself a feminine touch — a French manicure for her toes and for her fingers, the latter with acrylic nails.

On the Friday after the Wednesday divorce date, one of Frank's cohorts at Chem-tronics noted that he was almost unrecognizable. "He was always the picture of health," he recalled. "But that day I couldn't believe how bad he looked. Skinny and drawn."

Lee Court — which, postdivorce, belonged to Ginger Wolbers — is a single-family house with a curved driveway at the top of a hill. Beside the kitchen was a living room with a slidingglass door onto the patio, and on the far side of the living room, a hallway led to a bedroom, a bathroom,





Sometime after Erica left, Frank parked his truck a quarter mile from the home. He made his way to the house and the unlocked back patio door.

Inside the house, Ginger was wearing black stretch pants and a blue long-sleeved button-up shirt. Beneath that she had on a black camisole and a black brassiere with purple trim. She wore bracelets on both wrists. two rings on her right hand, and one ring on her left.

Earlier, she'd used a broiler pan to cook a chicken and, after eating, left the bones on a plate. On the living room table was a beer

The documented number of sharp-force injuries was 86 — 22 stab wounds and 64 incised injuries.

For most of the attack, Ginger was in her bedroom. Next to the bed, the wall was smeared and the carpet stained with blood. On the bedroom wall were the panic alarm and an


intercom unit. Blood covered both devices. At one point, Ginger may have fled the bedroom and gotten as far as the bathroom. Streaks of blood ran on the carpet and walls between the two rooms. Frank may or may

not have known that the guns had been returned to her, but he knew where they were kept. Incredibly, the key to the gun cabinet was in the locking mechanism. Frank pulled out a 12-gauge shotgun. It was unloaded. He headed for the garage, where, in a locked cabinet, the ammunition was kept. Frank bent the key in the process of unlock-

ing the cabinet. He grabbed a box of Federal ammunition, labeled "game load," "lead," and "25 shot shells/ cartouches." He took the box into the kitchen, placed it on the kitchen counter, and loaded the shotgun. Blood dripped from the bedroom through the living room and into the garage. Blood smeared the ammunition cabinet, the box of shells, and the kitchen counter.

It may have been while Frank was getting shells and loading the shotgun that Ginger pressed the panic button.

In the bedroom, Frank stood above Ginger. At close range, he shot her in her upper chest. The lead buckshot made a tight one-and-one-eighthinch entrance wound, with pellets and wadding going in above her left breast. Some of the buckshot and wadding exited through her back. The gun blast caused "marked injury," wrote a deputy medical examiner, "of her left lung and vascular, nerve, and skeletal structures of her left upper pleural cavity and shoulder."

After shooting Ginger, Frank turned the gun on himself.

* * * When the deputy arrived, he looked through the front window and saw a drinking glass and bottle lying on the floor. He checked with the sheriff's dispatcher, who told him that the resident had a restraining order out on her ex-husband, whom she had accused of rape. He called for backup, and ten minutes later he and another deputy found a sliding-glass door open at the rear of the house. Inside, they heard moaning.

Ginger and Frank

were on the bedroom floor. Ginger was covered with blood and not moving. Frank was nearby with a 12-gauge shotgun wound to his upper abdomen. The gun was beside him, and he was moaning. The deputies called for an ambulance from Lakeside Fire Station No. 3. Within a half hour, the ambulance transported Frank to Sharp Memorial Hospital.

On the floor, Ginger was semiprone, her left leg under the bed. Her right arm and wrist were bent near her face. A deputy moved Ginger's arm, which was draped over her face. No response. At 10:30 p.m., Ginger was confirmed dead.

During the investigation of the crime scene, from which the foregoing details come, police detectives and medical examiners concluded that after Frank had beaten, slashed, stabbed, and shot his ex-wife, he pressed the muzzle of the shotgun just below his breastbone and fired. Still, before he could be charged with murder, authorities needed to talk to Frank. As soon as he came around.

On Monday, June 2, the medical examiner completed the investigative report, concluding that Ginger had died of "multiple stab wounds and shotgun


friends and family were shocked. Ginger's lawyer, J.R. Givens, said that he had had a "kind of premonition" about Frank's growing instability, which is why he worried about retrieving the guns. One friend said that though Ginger was afraid, he never thought Frank would kill her. And yet Ginger told a select few that Frank had changed "completely." Ginger's cousin, Sheryl Parsons, who lives in Utah, told the Union-*Tribune:* "I think more than anything we want to make sure [that] if he lives that he never sees daylight. She did not deserve this." Erica expressed no interest in visiting her father in

the hospital. She even refused to tell Frank's friends where he was.

Ginger's mother, Patty Collins, said that "we were all trying to get Ginger away from him. He got her anyhow. There's only so much vou can do."

At Sharp, the night of the shooting, Frank was taken to surgery. He underwent exploratory laparotomy. This procedure found that the xiphoid (the lowest part of the sternum), the lower portion of his ribcage, his stomach, the left lower portion of his liver, his transverse colon, and loops of small bowel were "all obliterated," according to medical records. "Portions of his stomach, bowels and liver were removed." The

Because of a blood infection and "multiple episodes of sepsis," he developed gangrene in his lower legs and knees. Months after his suicide attempt, his legs were amputated, five to six inches below the knee. When gangrene developed in his fingers, nine of ten were cut off. For much of the time, Frank was in a drug-induced coma. He did speak to detectives, but he was never charged, a fact that perplexed many of Frank's and Ginger's friends. Into 2009, Frank

The medical examiner's description of a lifeless, friendless, shriveled, and wasted Frank Bass is grimly revealing: "On 2/13/10, the decedent was viewed lying supine on a hospital bed at Edgemoor Geriatric Hospital. He was dressed in a hospital gown and was noted to have multiple fistula drains coming from wounds in his abdomen. He was extremely cachectic and was noted to have healed bilateral BKA [below knee amputation] and amputation

of all of his fingers except for a thumb. He was flaccid, warm to the touch and had forming posterior lividity present." Two aides "placed the decedent in a new white vinyl pouch and blue seal #1175108 was affixed."

The autopsy report said that Frank, who once weighed 185 pounds, had dropped to 97. A final X-ray showed that there were still "multiple small round pellets concentrated in the upper abdomen." He was cremated. No memorial service was held. One of his shooter friends told me through tears that of the group of 30, not one "wanted to remember him."

* * *

One mystery that remained after the shooting was why Frank had shot himself in the abdomen. Several friends wondered whether he'd targeted his abdomen so that he wouldn't die, at least, not right away.

A few weeks after the shooting, sheriff's department detectives talked to Frank. Spokesman Dennis Brugos described their interview to me. He said Frank remembered little of that night's mayhem. He didn't remember their arguing or his beating, stabbing, and shooting Ginger. But he did recall taking her shotgun out of the cabinet in the closet and shooting himself. How? Frank put the shotgun on his shoulder. He grabbed the barrel with his left hand and, holding the butt with his right hand, aimed the muzzle at himself and pressed the trigger. The shot entered his up-

per abdomen and went down into his stomach at a steep angle. The detective on the case confirmed that "the shot pattern matches his statement." The detectives wondered if Frank had intended to shoot himself in the gut; Frank told them he'd aimed for his heart

During Frank's hospitalization, friends and fellow shooters speculated about what had happened.

On a website, Alpine Forum, where people have commented about the death of Ginger and the attempted suicide of Frank, Dr. Julius Hempstead of La Jolla wrote, "To those of you who are wondering, this is exactly why there are 'how-to' suicide websites. Never shoot yourself in the abdomen of all places. The pain is probably as bad as it gets, and it often fails to get the job done. Those sites are meant to minimize pain and the embarrassment of failing at suicide. He must have not really wanted to die. I mean nobody is that dumb to shoot themselves in the stomach for a suicide."

One of Frank's gun pals thinks that the barrel of a 12-gauge is so long that Frank couldn't have reached the trigger.

"If he wanted to kill himself, he would put the gun under his chin. That way he could at least reach the trigger and do a proper job of killing himself."

"Would he have known that?" "Oh yeah. Oh

yeah."

But he didn't do a "proper job."

Another friend echoed the sentiment: "He should have had the balls to do it right. Besides, if you put a load of lead in your belly, you've got to know that's going to poison your system." Still another pal

believes Frank didn't want to die: Why did he go back to work when Chem-tronics called? Why did he start the process of buying a house with his son? Such are not the plans of an irrational man. Because he imagined a future for himself, this man believes Ginger shot Frank before Frank shot her. The barrel of the shotgun, he told me, was too long for Frank to reach the trigger and shoot himself in the abdomen.

Detectives found no evidence that Ginger shot Frank. Brugos told me that the sheriff's department is satisfied this was a murder-suicide with 20 months separating the two deaths.

Brugos said there's no mystery to why Frank wasn't charged. When a murder suspect is severely wounded, homicide detectives typically wait to see "how his condition plays out." The sheriff's department had no way to care for him, nor was he able to go to court, let alone stand trial. Brugos noted, Frank "wasn't going anywhere."

As traumatic as the knife assault was for Ginger, it's possible that she never felt the gunshot blast. In the interim of the knife attack and Frank's getting and loading the gun, she may have expired. — Thomas Larson


Palomar Pioneers: Of Travail And Tragedy

Rattler Man

Joseph Beresford, son of a British Lord, fell in love with the gardener's daughter. His father, whose lineage went back to James I, gave him an ultimatum: marry beneath your rank and lose your inheritance. Joseph chose love. His father not only disowned him, he gave Joseph a small sum of money and banished him from England forever.

As they sailed to America in the late 1860s. Joseph assured his bride he'd strike gold in California. They would return in such high style that all the Beresfords — including a nephew who became Lord Mayor of London — would embrace them.

By the time they reached Yuma, the Beresfords had two daughters. As they watched rope-pulled ferries

cross the muddy Colorado, Joseph heard tales of lost treasure.

Thomas L. "Peg Leg" Smith, a mountain man who died in 1866. allegedly discovered "fabulous wealth" near three small buttes, three days west of the river. Most prospectors assumed that meant around Borrego Springs. But a self-proclaimed insider said no: the buttes, and nuggets the size of oranges, lay near a great mountain northwest of the desert.

The family had become so accustomed to hardship, they eagerly traversed the arid wasteland in 110-degree heat. To avoid human contact, they skirted the Southern Emigrant Trail Camp at Warner's Ranch, and continued beyond Hot Springs Mountain, the highest peak in San Diego County. They ascended into Lost Valley. A few days later, they headed west, toward Palomar.

One cold evening, somewhere on the eastern slope, Joseph found an abandoned adobe structure near a flowing spring. Except for a fireplace and a tall pile of

straw, the single room was empty. While he started a fire, his wife and daughters made straw beds on the dirt floor — and soon fell asleep.

Joseph went out to care for the horses and rustle up firewood. He heard shouts, then sky-piercing shrieks. He raced back inside.

Rattlesnakes, which had crawled into the straw for warmth, shook staccato clacks and struck and struck the women like punching fists.

"On the past he does not dwell," wrote Guy O. Glazier in the early 1920s. "Still I verily believe that Joseph Beresford, reportedly heir to an English

Lizzie was much more withdrawn and "never very robust." Both were dressmakers, "neat as a pin," who enjoyed refined living. They sold every-

Escondido. Davis: The "sisters, totally unused to manual labor, packed these boards on their backs, one at a time, over a crooked, rocky trail." The work was arduous, but, Davis adds, "they asked no help or favors and received no assistance during all their life on Palomar.'

The cabin slowly took shape, but needed a roof. Halfway up the slope, Mariah found a grove of cedars. She and Lizzie made the climb every day until they had split enough three-foot shake shingles to cover their home.

Those who saw the property wondered why the sisters chose it. Ravines and hillocks afforded little arable land. The cabin was over a mile from Jim, their nearest neighbor, and at night coyotes howled nearby.

The sisters lived there for ten years. Mariah sold eggs and butter to neighbors and hotels. The Mendenhall children swore that Lizzie made the best biscuits around. In the beginning, writes Catherine Wood, the sisters "sometimes joined their neighbors in picnics." Mariah had the first Kodak camera on Palomar and loved taking pictures. Many of them, now long gone, were of a man who proposed marriage. But when Lizzie, whose health began to fail, objected, Mariah said no. Arthritis wracked

Lizzie's legs. Her stiffening hands made her specialty, lacework, impossible. In time, she could barely sew.

In 1898, to generate income Mariah began working for the post office. In those days Palomar had two: Jessee and Nellie, named for their first postmasters, Harriet L. Jessee and Nellie McQueen. Three times a week, regardless of the weather, Mariah rode the steep, serpentine Trujillo Trail down the south slope and back to Jessee.

Joseph grabbed a large stick and slashed with swift and terrible fury. But every time he killed one, another twitching tongue emerged from the straw. He pounded their hard, triangular heads, or speared and flung them at the walls.

rocky trail."

Joseph was enough of a pioneer to know that, to make sure you don't step near a sharp fang by accident, you kill a rattlesnake twice. He dragged each one outside and chopped off its head. When he was done, 16 California black rattlers lay just beyond the door.

The screams abated. Bit countless times, his wife and daughters were either dead or dying. The next day, he buried them.

Joseph became known as "the hermit of Smith's mountain" (Palomar's early name). In the words of long-time resident Robert Asher, he was one of the region's "forlornlites." He'd sometimes wave to passers-by, even let himself be photographed, but kept away from people.

Two legends grew. In the 1870s he raised sheep, he said, "because there was nothing else to do." When sheepherding declined - cattlemen wanted the bunchgrassrich valleys for their herds — Joseph had no visible means of support. Yet he remained on the mountain for decades. To this day, many believe he used Palomar as a base, made frequent forays throughout the region, and actually found the lost treasure.

The second legend is actual fact. Palomar Mountain has surprisingly few rattlesnakes. That's because for over 50 years, Joseph Beresford hunted down and slaughtered every rattler he could find.

Sisters of Solitude

Maybe they weren't Maybe that's lonely. just a flatlander's citified view of two women who fled from human contact. But long-time residents of the mountain ponder the Frazier sisters' profound seclusion. Edward Davis, who knew the "modest, retiring ladies," said, "I often wonder what these women got out of life."

Jim Frazier came to Palomar with his invalid wife and young daughter. He bought the old Morrison property and planned to raise hogs and cattle. The small, southwestfacing cabin stood on a promontory - today's Frazier Point - below the snow-line, with an expansive view of San Diego County.

Jim's wife died shortly after they moved in. He wrote his sisters, Mariah and Lizzie. Come west, he urged them. Help care for the child.

The sisters had a small farm near the Illinois/Missouri border. Mariah was tall and thin, a "handsome young woman," writes Marion F. Beckler, "with personality and sparkle." Petite in 1895. Not wanting to be left alone, their mother joined them. Jim drove his two-


mule spring wagon to meet them in San Diego. He had awkward news: he'd married a woman with two children. He moved his new family to the east end of Mendenhall Valley (southeast of Palomar Observatory), where he'd built a cabin and barn. The cabin was cramped for five people and way too small for eight. His mother and sisters could return to Illinois or live somewhere nearby.

Mariah and Lizzie decided to stay. They rented the old Wolfe place in Mendenhall. A curse, some said, hung over the abandoned cabin: Wolfe, an ex-stage driver, fell in love with a married, redheaded woman. Her husband, also an ex-driver, shot and killed Wolfe, then left the region.

Shortly after moving in, the Fraziers' mother died.

The sisters decided to homestead a canyonlike property at the edge of Barker Valley. To make a trail up to Jim's house, a good 2000 feet higher in elevation, they chopped down swaths of manzanita, thick acacia bushes, and poison oak. They rolled boulders to the side, first making sure no scorpions or rattlesnakes lurked in the shadows. Then, with pick and shovel, they graded the steep path.

For their cabin, Jim brought boards from

Mariah wore a bonnet and divided skirts. She refused to ride sidesaddle, as was the fashion for women. Before she reached Jessee, she'd dismount and walk because, writes Davis, she was "too modest to be seen riding astride."

During this period, Jim's wife left him. So the sisters moved in: summers at the Mendenhall cabin; winters, ten miles southwest, at Frazier Point. Lizzie's arthritis became so severe, she needed a rocking chair to move about. In time, her legs became paralyzed.

One spring morning, as Jim prepared to drive Lizzie to the summer cabin, he passed out in the wagon. Lizzie checked his pulse. Jim was dead.

"After that," writes Wood, "the two sisters, who were well thought of by all their neighbors, carried on alone."

Mariah did all the work: building fences and corrals, plowing, sewing, reaping. She carried every drop of water they used and tended their 60 head of cattle. She still delivered the mail, this time from Nellie to Jessee. Since she'd often return late at night, before she left, Mariah spread canvas across the windows and locked Lizzie in the cabin. If a man came near, Lizzie must not budge. To assure her sister's safety, Mariah jammed slivers of wood into the keyhole. Two dogs - some say "halfstarved" - kept watch outside.

Mrs. Hodgie Salmons saw the sisters from afar for five years before they ever spoke to her. She became one of their few friends. One day, Hodgie wanted to pay Lizzie a call at the point. When she neared the cabin, she saw no sign of life. She shouted hellos and knocked several times. Rude hands fumbled with the lock. Lizzie opened the door a crack, smiled, and invited Hodgie into a "dark and gloomy" room.

"I thought no one was home," said Hodgie.

"When Mariah goes off," said Lizzie, "she locks everything up, including me. She's afraid some man will come and kill me."

Whenever a man came to the cabin, writes Davis, Mariah opened the

door holding a knife in her calloused hand. "She was never known to shoot anybody or even threaten, echoed through the cabin, but the nearest neighbors, the Mendenhalls, were a good two miles away. 2. Edward Davis: The Frazier sisters "were very refined, honorable, honest and cultivated people

but she was always ready." One evening, as the

sisters prepared dinner at Frazier Point, the stovepipe overheated. The ceiling of their four-room cabin caught fire. They had no water. The spring was a good 100 yards away. Mariah thought fast. Milk! She filled a pan, stood on a box, and doused the flames.

Somehow Lizzie made it outside. Davis: "No one, even Miss Lizzie herself. could explain how she accomplished the feat."

Twice in the spring of 1918, when Mariah harrowed fields at the East Mendenhall property, she tripped and couldn't move. As she clung to the reins, mules dragged her back to the cabin.

On a Sunday in November, 1918, Mariah spent most of the morning chasing down stray calves. After stowing the last one back in the corral, she entered the cabin, ringing wet and glassyeyed, and slumped on the bed.

Noticing that Mariah had become strangely quiet, Lizzie went to her side. To Lizzie's horror, her beloved sister — and life support system for the past 15 years - was dead. A shocked Lizzie

straightened Mariah's hair, crossed her hands on her chest, and prepared her to receive mourners.

For a touch of culture amid the wild, the sisters had a little bell, with a white handkerchief attached. Lizzie always rang it at dinnertime. To attract attention, Lizzie opened the door, propped herself against her chair, and began ringing the bell. The sounds Lizzie shook and shook the bell. Every ring shot pain through her crooked fingers.

No one heard. Mariah's body began to decompose. Lizzie needed to go outside. Inch by inch, dragging a pail of water behind, she lugged herself up to their apple orchard on a small rise. Lizzie rang the little bell for two cold days and nights.

On Wednesday, Retha Mae Mendenhall hadn't seen Mariah ride past their house for quite some time. She and Marion Davis decided to check up on the sisters. As their wagon approached the orchard, they noticed something white waving among the trees. Then they heard a slow, soft tinkling.

They found Lizzie, staring straight ahead, ringing and ringing the bell

Lizzie stayed for a while with the Salmons, Louis, and her friend Hodgie, then returned to Illinois. She died, soon after, while eating breakfast.

Neighbors buried Mariah under a large black oak, about 40 feet from the house. In 1929, Edward Davis visited the site. He saw "a stake at the head and a white rock at the foot," but "no name, date, or other sign to tell even that a grave was there."



This ancient Hohokam home housed one large family

Casa Grande Ruins National Monument, Arizona By Michelle Williams

Casa Grande Ruins National Monument is located in Coolidge, Arizona, about an hour's drive from either Phoenix or Tucson. It's believed that this ancient structure was occupied by one large family of the Hohokam society. Ancestors of the Pima Indians, the Hohokam made pottery and jewelry, farmed the land, and traded their wares for a variety of items.

This building is part of a compound, much like our neighborhoods. Within one square mile, a number of other compounds stood during the early 1300s. It's believed that this compound was only occupied for a few generations before it was abandoned toward the end of the century. The reasons for the decline of the Hohokam society are unknown

To protect the ruins, Congress declared it a federal reserve in 1889. The structure was repaired and reinforced. The roof you see here was built in 1932 at a cost of \$28,000 — it needs repainting every 15 to 20 years at a cost of over \$100,000.

The land occupied by these ruins is in the heart of the city, and Casa Grande is visible from many of the main streets running along its perimeter. From the parking lot of a brand-new strip mall or gas station, you can see the remnants of a prehistoric society. The contrast is striking.

Ocean Water Temperatures are rising into the mid-60s this month, perhaps to reach the 70s in July or August. The usual early-summer cool weather along San Diego's coastline, which is disappointing to many tourists, is mostly caused by the sluggish warming of the ocean water. The payoff will come later: as the ocean gives up heat absorbed during the sunny summer months, we'll enjoy warm days and evenings well into autumn.

"June Gloom," the cool and intermittently overcast conditions likely to dominate the beach and coastal areas through the remainder of this month, mocks the already sizzling temperatures inland. If it weren't for the ocean's enormous resistance to changes in temperature, the hottest weather along the coast would occur soon after the summer solstice — June 21. Our warmest beach weather will probably not arrive until August or even early September, just about the time the ocean water temperatures are peaking.

The Chirping of Crickets tells us the warmer weather of summer is well on its way. Their plaintive pleadings for mates are heard wherever bits of seminatural scenery cut across the urban tapestry of San Diego. Try the Spruce Street suspension footbridge, west of Balboa Park between Front and Brant streets. From the swaying deck of the 70-foot-high bridge you can admire a canyon filled with green and gold grasses, nasturtiums,

Western Azalea, a native rhododendron, is blooming this month in scattered locations throughout the county's higher mountains. Fond of semi-shade, it's often found growing along creeks and canyon bottoms. Like its ornamental cousins, western azalea's fragrant white (sometimes pink- or vellow-tinted) flowers are borne in ornate clusters. Palomar Mountain State Park harbors a colony of them alongside a trail linking Doane Valley and Chimney Flats. White-flowering azaleas are recovering along the Azalea Glen Trail in Cuvamaca Rancho State Park, the area thoroughly burned during the 2003 Cedar Fire.

The Blooming of Desert Annuals is over, but not so for the stolid desert willows and smoke trees. Rooted to the beds of dry washes throughout Anza-Borrego's lower valleys, both plants gather enough energy this time of year to put on an impressive floral show. The graceful, drooping branches of the desert willow hold fragrant, white blossoms, while the spindly smoke tree exhibits myriads of blue-purple flowers. To avoid the intense midday heat, confine your desert explorations to early morning or early evening. And watch out for bees - they're attracted to the blossoms, too.

SAN CLEMENTE CANYON

Marian Bear Park in University City offers a quasi-wilderness experience.

Distance from downtown San Diego: 10 miles Hiking or biking length: 1 to 6 miles on out-and-back trails • Difficulty: Easy to moderate


Eastbound in the right lane of Highway 52, the San Clemente Canyon Freeway, you can look down upon a long, slender, almost unbroken swath of natural vegetation: massive sycamores, stately live oaks, swaying willows, climbing vines, and tangled shrubs. This is one of San Diego County's best examples of riparian, or streamloving, vegetation. Only about 0.2 percent of the county's land area consists of this type of vegetation, and some of the best of that is represented here.

Much of San Clemente Canyon and several of its steep finger canyons are included in the boundaries of Marian Bear Park, an area set aside by the City of San Diego as natural

open space. Facilities include parking areas, picnic tables, and rest rooms off Regents Road and Genesee Avenue, and resting benches elsewhere. If you can manage to visit the park early on a Sunday morning, you will be rewarded with near-silence and plenty of audible birdsong. Otherwise, on a typical day, you'll get plenty of white noise from the freeway traffic nearby. There are several ways

to enter Marian Bear Park, but the principal trailhead lies along the east side of Genesee Avenue just south of the 52 Freeway. From this gateway, the main trail, an old roadbed that today is essentially a trail of variable width, goes both east toward Interstate 805 and west toward Interstate 5. The trail weaves back and across the currently sluggish canyon stream, accompanied much of the time by a canopy of sycamores and oaks.

The east end of the park (between Genesee Avenue and Interstate 805) offers the prettiest vegetation, the densest







in't it funny how things happen in strings? Maybe that's what string theory's all about. But one week after chew-chewing gourmet burgers downtown

at Neighborhood, I'm being tempted by another hip joint (heh-heh) that sells burgers as, like, urban delicacies. This one sits smack-dab on a railroad track.

Place is called Station Tavern

& Burgers. Outside, it's a big, dark-gray timber building with small windows. But once you're through the door, you're in a trendy triangular bar area, all varnished wood and varnished tables, which opens onto a way-big patio. Main difference from last week's place is, instead of your hip downtown crowd, here you get the cries and laughs of kids, dogs leaping around in the giant outside sandpit, and the buzz of parties of 30-something folks drinking and eating - some even smoking - at long, campground-style wooden tables. Half the tables are planted out in the sandpit itself, among kid-size make-believe trolleys and train signals, all under strings of lights. In the deepening dusk, beautiful. Sigh.

You want to start humming *The railroad comes through the middle of the house...* Remember that song? This used to be Snippy's Tavern, a dark li'l old triangular bar that had been around forever. The building's shaped as it is because, 100 years ago, the San Diego Electric Railway Company's trolley cars, heading up from downtown to North Park, couldn't do 90-degree turns, so the rails angled through this block to get them down to 30th. This crazy dogleg's been here ever since.

The ancient green "Snippy's Tavern" board hangs on the red-painted eastern wall now. This time of night — six, seven — there're lots of kids playing in the sand and aboard the trolley wagon. Moms can relax because a big board fence stands between us and the street. Some moms and dads and singles hang out around a log fire roaring from a bowl-shaped hearth.



hotdog.

Man. A lotta thought's gone into this. You can tell from the laughs and the general murmur, people are relaxed.

I take a stool at the open side of the bar,

pick up a map of the trolley's 1918 route. Ah... Other side's the menu. It's pretty simple. Five burgers, plus "side cars" of four types of fries and a house salad. And two items for "li'l riders," grilled cheese or

The basic hamburger's a third-pounder "elevated with house spice blend," for \$6. The cheeseburger's 50 cents more. The turkey burger — "This bird is ready for flight!" is also \$6.50. So are the "spicy black bean burger" and house veggie burger, "made from chickpeas with a smoky paprika spread." The sides cost a bit. French fries are \$2.50, and sweet-potato-and-garlic fries and Tater Tots are \$3.50 each. The house salad is \$4. But if you have them with the burgers, they're only \$1.50 (for french fries or salad) or \$2 (for Tots and sweet-potato fries).

The barkeep, Jimmy, is kinda on the run, so when he turns up, I cut to the chase. "What beer grabs you most?"

"We have six draft beers," he says.

"But I really dig AleSmith X."

"Okay. AleSmith X it is." Beer's \$4.60. He pours me one straight away.

"And a black bean burger," I say. The burger (\$8.50 with the sweet-potato fries) doesn't take too long to turn up either. And here's the thing: I thought this was going to be a meat patty with black beans splotted on top, but no, the black beans *are* the patty. It's another veggie burger. Hey, we're in the Vegan Republic of South Park. Say no more.

Confession: I didn't realize it was just beans until after I was halfway through, when Jimmy told me. I guess it's the patty shape, plus those black beans have the feel of ground meat. All I know is it tastes Cuban, spicy — they have jalapeños and chipotles in there — and truly,



it goes perfectly with the sweet-potato fries. But what I like best is it doesn't just taste beany. There's deep flavor — smoky, sweet, maybe even chocolatey (must be the chipotle), and rich flashes (bursting jalapeño seeds?) happening as you chew.

"I picked up a few ideas in Belize," says this guy Jason. He runs the kitchen. "The base for the black bean burger is onion, garlic, chipotle, and fresh jalapeños. And I use ground flaxseed as a binder, not egg. So it's cool for vegans."

He says something about toasted cumin that rings a bell with what I was tasting. A nutty, peppery thing going on.

He says he's expanding the meat choices as well. "We're looking at adding bison, ostrich, whatever's affordable."

Sam, who started this, is the same guy who resurrected the Turf Club, the cocktail and grill-your-own-steak joint up in Golden Hill (though he lost control of that after ten years and has now used the same idea for his new supper club in La Mesa, the Riviera). "But I always wanted a classic beer/burger place with open space where everybody feels welcome," he says, when I run across him later. "You know, singles, families, moms, kids, smokers [in special areas outside], dogs. I grew up in North Park. That's what this part of town is all about."

"Mind if I sit next to you?" Gal's name is Merete. Originally from Denmark. She works here promoting art in the schools. Man, good luck to that. She orders a cheeseburger, fries, and an AleSmith X ale. We get to talking. "I feel comfortable coming to a place like this,"

she says. "It's cool, but it doesn't have that sports-bar come-on thing."

She's so right. Here, there's a new-old feel. I take a slurp of my AleSmith X and stare out across the sandpit where the tracks used to be. That song my dad used to sing comes drifting back.

They let us live in the front of the house/ They let us live in the back / But there ain't no living in the middle of the house/ 'Cause that's the railroad track.

Or, hey, how about the last line? *I'm singing this song in the middle of the house*... There's even a train whistle. Haven't thought of that for years.

"Wow," I say to Merete. "This AleSmith... You getting flashbacks?" ■



Playable Art. "I don't

know how to play a musical instrument," says Sue Spray, "but I know how to make a guitar that sounds really good."

Spray also builds ukuleles and Celtic harps.

"Some of my guitars have unique, wonderful sound qualities to them. But when people ask me what particular shape it is, I have to tell them it's a Sue Spray shape and not a typical classical shape, because when I built my first one I didn't know there was a typical classical shape."

Spray hosts a group called the Luthier's Cooperative at her Vista woodworking shop. They meet Tuesdays and Thursdays to build acoustic

guitars that are testaments to craftsmanship and rare woods, such as quilted maple, Indian rosewood, and European spruce. Spray calls them "playable art." They come with a player's warranty and a National Fine Arts Registration.

"We get together and build guitars the old-fashioned way with hand tools and mastercraftsman procedures. And when we finish the guitars, we put them up for sale in an annual exhibit. When they sell [Spray says the co-op's guitars can fetch as much as \$3500 each], we donate a portion of the proceeds to charity."

At their first annual guitar sale and exhibit at the E Street Café in Encinitas in May, Spray says the co-op donated 10 percent of the sales to the Helen Woodward Animal Center in Rancho Santa Fe.

"I made the choice because I am a retired veterinarian and I feel strongly about animal welfare," she says.

The idea for the Luthier's Cooperative began in 2007 after Spray and a group of friends completed a guitarbuilding course at Palomar College.

"We decided that we wanted to continue working, so we started meeting at my shop one day a week," says Spray. One day became two. Now, she says the group can complete up to 20 guitars in a year.

By design, she says, the coop's goal is not to make a lot of money. They'd like to generate enough cash to buy the materials to make more guitars, pay a little for their time, and give the rest to the community in the form of donations.

"We're not trying to make a killing," Spray says. "We're just building guitars. And we need to do something with them because none of us play."

They plan to embark on a "slow tour" of the U.S. in October for a least a year.

Most artists have fans; Courtney Love has defenders. I used to be one myself. There are a lot fewer of them than there used to be in Love's '90s heyday, but you can still find defenders saying things like "If only everyone weren't so distracted by her personal life and could see what a brilliant artist she is!" Even some of the critics who have trashed her new Hole album, *Nobody's Daughter*, have gone out of their way to defend her '90s work. I think the defenders are missing something that should have been obvious long ago: Love is an artist whose primary medium is fame itself. She plays her messed-up personal life the way Jack White plays a guitar solo. As the subject of magazine articles, she is a virtuoso.

Listen to "Doll Parts," from Hole's breakthrough 1994 album, *Live Through This*, released just days after Love's husband's suicide. Love's singing is off key. The lyrics are little more than "Someday you will ache like I ache" repeated over and over. But it wasn't

that her voice and lyrics were just parts of her persona — an intelligent but wild woman who was determined to make it as a rock star, a movie star, whatever. She forced you to take sides either for or against her. It was fascinating for awhile, but at some point she needed to come up with something new to say other than

"Look at me!" and "I ache!" The truth is, *Nobody's Daughter* is pretty good. But Love had better be damn good in concert if she wants to win fans instead of merely hanging on to her defenders.

The mighty Tris McCall. Straight out of Jersey (City). Track one clarifies (as in butter) the narrator's inability to portray himself in life as he feels with the ultimate college radio station (which eventually lost its college), then re-coalesces those disparate elements at room temperature. Track three follows a man who only wanted to better manage waste treatment, then allowed himself to admit to himself that he saw a superhero

in the mirror — before the world he let into his bedroom breaks that mirror for him.

Track five tries to equate theft and vandalism with the nobility of Gandhi (and the sound of Smokey Robinson and the Miracles), allowing defeat before its end through

acknowledgment that an act can't be judged noble or not if no one notices or cares enough to settle into the judgment seat. Track seven, with more soul-singing plus a piano-plinking intro, swerves into the reverse succession of fast-food restaurants on one site, jumping off script to speculate about the narrator's past lives, then back to plastic-sign archaeology, invoking a small child having a bad day alongside an avowal: "It's all so deeply horrible, it's great to be alive."

I thought about mentioning the other tracks but figured on a record this rich I'd leave some for you to plunder by your lonesome. You don't have to be from Jersey. You just have to have ears. And oxygen.


Peter Wolf: Midnight Souvenirs CD Review by Alan Segal

Peter Wolf started in the music industry playing with bluesmen Muddy Waters and John Lee Hooker. He was also an influential freeform disc jockey but got famous as the lead singer for the J. Geils Band ("Centerfold").

Midnight Souvenirs is Wolf's seventh solo effort and his first in eight years. From the opening country-rock duet "Tragedy" with Shelby Lynne, to the acoustic "Green Fields of Summer" with Neko Case, to the retro-country duet "It's Too Late for Me" with Merle Haggard, Wolf doesn't mind sharing the spotlight.

The standout tracks,

"Overnight Lows" is a hip knock-off of the Chi-Lites' "Have You Seen Her," featuring a playful voiceover confession from Wolf: "You know some people are always running away from love... 





King John

The book on Shakespeare's history play: he wrote it when quite young (1587 or '89), and it doesn't compare with his later works. True, but guess what? Although the script's herky-jerky and hardcore declamatory (when in doubt, SHOUT!), it's also quite playable, as proved by the Intrepid Shakespeare Company's current offering. Codirectors Sean Cox and Christy Yael relocated the King's reign (late 12th, early 13th Century) to today, so the questions of commodity and legitimacy take on a postpostmodern tinge (i.e., what "borrowed authority makes a king a king?). The actors need to curb excesses and speak the lines, first and foremost, to communicate. As John, the "most unkingly of kings," Tom Hall implodes before our eyes. Sean Cox's Bastard moves from outsider to insider, observer to agent, Cox supplying a rich palette of emotions. Wendy Waddell does a fine turn as Cardinal Pandulph,

back and forth, showing the rise of radio from itinerant disc jockeys in the hinterlands to David Sarnoff beginning NBC. Young Davey Ouinn runs off with Frankie, a blind woman. After they're separated. Quinn tries to find her, through the "ether" of the airways, by telling their tale on the radio. The relent lessly nonlinear play is tricky to stage, since only three actors must handle all the parts (adding a fourth actor would make it less a tour de force but would give it more fluidity). The North Coast Rep's staging, beautifully directed by Lynn Griffin, treats the occasionally flawed play as a masterpiece. Griffin and her excellent cast have found all the humor and have added depth to one-dimensional roles: savvy David Meyers as Quinn and others; Jason Maddy quite funny as nervous Leon (though his preacher, James, is too cartoony); and the outstanding Amanda Sitton as blind Frankie and garrulous Susie. Marty Burnett's set, a vast wheat field behind a scrim. ranks among his most appealing. Renatta Lloyd's appropriately

The Whipping Man

Playwright Matthew Lopez discovered a surprising parallel in U.S. history: the Jewish Passover took place the same week the Civil War ended. Like the Jews leaving Egypt, African-American slaves were set free. Caleb De Leon, a Southern Jew, comes home to a plantation in ruins. Old Simon and young John, former slaves who adopted their master's faith, remain behind, asking "were we Jews, or were we slaves?" The answers (which come late and too hastily) are devastating. Whipping Man has the makings (a boffo amputation scene), but talk and exposition dominate. The cast, directed by Giovanna Sarcelli, makes the most of the strong moments. Avery Glymph's John has the most range, from sly humor to flashing anger. Underwritten Caleb is the play's dartboard, growing more and more evil. Mark J. Sullivan, whether screaming in pain or anger, rarely rises above rant. Though he had trouble with his lines when I saw the show, Charlie Robinson gave Simon a dearly earned stability, marbled with wisdom, as when he tells John, "You don't lose your faith by askin'. You lose your faith by not askin'. Worth a try.

Back to the Future

The longer version would seem to be designed more for scholarship than for pleasure.

n my years at this post, there have been no fewer than three re-releases of Fritz Lang's *Metropolis*. (A measure, some might

suggest, of a too long length of time.) The latest one, at the Ken Cinema for the following week, makes

the grade as rather a full-blown restoration than a simple reissue, boasting almost a half-hour of new footage from a 16mm print uncovered two years ago in Buenos Aires. Even with all that, a couple of lacunae still remain, and for these we have blank-screen intertitles to explain to us what we would be seeing if we had the footage to show it. In hopes of avoiding a misunderstanding, let me state straightaway that this vision of the future from the vantage point of 1926 — this seething Expressionistic, Christian, Freudian, Marxist stew - ought to be mandatory viewing for any devotee of the cinema

in general, and in specific the silent cinema or the science-fiction cinema. There. Duty done. Having said that, however, I may go on to say that

the prospect of a twoand-a-half-hour *Metropolis* aroused in me as much annoyance as curiosity. Enthusiasm

While fully granting the importance and influence of the film, I have to say that it has never been particularly dear to my heart, a thing to be seen again and again, and that on merit *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari*, as a nearby example, deserves to be revived at least as often as *Metropolis*. (Actual number over the same period: zero.) I have to stress, too, that it achieved its importance and its influence without the benefit of this extra half an hour. Its reputation can in no way be said to have been damaged by the withheld footage.


The new longer version, restoring

the work to a form in which it was never widely exhibited, would seem to be designed more for scholarship than for pleasure, an assertion that might be made to some degree about any of the shorter versions as well, ranging anywhere from around an hour and a half to two hours. It's true that certain restored films have been proven to move faster or at any rate feel shorter in their longer forms: Visconti's *The Leopard* and *Ludwig* come to mind. This is not one of those cases. Whatever Lang's strengths may be (and they are several: composition, architecture, atmosphere, *angst*, most prominently), his pacing has never been one of them, although the disco *Metropolis* with the Giorgio Moroder score, released in 1984 at a full hour shorter than the current version, moved along nicely to the best of my recollection. In like manner, the restoration of Lang's *The Testament of Dr. Mabuse* (uncirculated theatrically) served above all to slow down what had been one of his liveliest creations.

The vast bulk of the recovered footage from Buenos Aires comes



down to added shots or lengthened shots within existing scenes (the only new scenes, if I was paying attention, involve the subordinate characters of the Big Brother spy, the fired underling, and the menial laborer with whom the sappy hero trades places), and by far the largest concentration of these occurs in the "Furioso" climax, as it is explicitly titled. Some of these last additions could arguably be held to heighten the intensity of the finale even as they unduly drag it out. I'm not sure. It's a little hard to tell. All of the added footage is easily and immediately identified by the poor quality of the print: the nonstop cascade of vertical scratches and the black bars at the top and left side of the image to make it conform to the aspect ratio, even if in smaller dimensions. This ease of identification makes it easy as well to gauge how unnecessary most of the additions are and how judicious was their original excision. And their substandard visual quality, standing out in stark contrast to their pristine surroundings, affords still another reason to cut them. Any intensity that might have been gained in the climax is more than offset by the distracting, disrupting voice in your head that is

continually registering *new... old... new... old... new... old....*

The elementary lesson to be taken away from all this is that not everything shot for a movie, no matter how deeply beloved or revered, demands to be seen. A filmmaker's every thought cannot be taken to be his finest or final thought. Quite likely the inevitable DVD will include the option of watching Metropolis with or without the additions, according to preference. But the finger of guilt nonetheless must point at the DVD industry, with its marketing ploys of "deleted scenes" and "outtakes" and "director's cut" and such, for feeding the fire. The excised footage makes no demand on its own; the demand is fomented. And the customer's sense of entitlement, sense of proprietorship, grows and grows. Forget the director's cut; it's the customer's cut that counts. One can imagine the frenzy for restorations someday reaching a point of absurdity where the newly discovered footage will be mere sweepings from the cuttingroom floor found in an unemptied trash bin in a cellar in Brussels or Prague.

To return to the present: Sex and the City 2, again written and directed by Michael Patrick King, transfers the base of operations from New York to Abu Dhabi, the advertised New Middle East where



the self-indulgent girls - er, selfindulgent middle-aged gals (Sarah Jessica Parker, Kristin Davis, Cynthia Nixon, Kim Cattrall) will be overindulged on an expenses-paid jaunt courtesy of an Arabian film producer, where they can bring their consumerist perspective to another culture (on the Muslim veil: "Certainly cuts back on the Botox bill"), and where Samantha, the only remaining unmarried in the group, can scandalize the backward natives ("New Middle East, my ass!"). This getaway from the Big Apple is also a getaway from an inchoate marital comedy about Carrie's new husband's couch-potato propensities for television and takeout, and his radical proposal (not an alternative open to the average married couple) to spend two nights a week in separate apartments. More than a getaway, really; more of a jump-ship. Loyal followers who consider these ninnies as personal friends will have their tolerance tested to the limit. Anyone as yet unacquainted with them should be encouraged to hold steady.

Prince of Persia: The Sands of Time is an Arabian Night-ly video game of computerized desertscapes, an all-over rosy glow, a magic dagger than can turn back time, a pretentious and presumptuous plot parallel to the present-day search for nonexistent WMDs in Iraq, and a British-accented Jake Gyllenhaal to fit in with Ben Kingsley, Alfred Molina, and Gemma Arterton, not to mention director Mike Newell. The major struggle, overpowering that for the prized dagger, is the viewer's versus the sandman.

The City of Your Final Destination, concerning the efforts of an Arab-American academic to secure the co-operation of the family for a biography of a suicided one-book author in Uruguay, is a Jamesian literary tale without the concentration, the ardor, the resonance. A James Ivory film post-Ismail Merchant (d. 2005), but still with Ruth Prawer Jhabvala to do the screenplay and Anthony Hopkins to anchor the able cast (Charlotte Gainsbourg, Laura Linney, Omar Metwally, Norma Aleandro), it is wholly adult, articulate, cultured, and all that, yet somehow

becalmed and enervated.

Harry Brown, directed by Daniel Barber, naturally calls to mind Gran Torino, if only for its proximity in time. But the vigilante-revenge plot brings it closer to a geriatric Death *Wish*, with a widowed pensioner in a London slum arming himself against Clockwork Orange ultra-violent youth and drawing on his training in the Royal Marines to avenge the murder of his chess mate. Michael Caine, to be sure, is no Clint Eastwood, nor was he ever a Charles Bronson, but he does set off a few faint echoes from the Harry Palmer spy films, Get Carter, The Destructors, et al. The gray and gritty surface and the elevated social consciousness do not diminish the implausibility.

And which of these four will we still be watching in eighty-four years?

MOVIE LISTINGS

Babies — A kind of nature documentary that looks at the human species the way another documentary might look at apes: a human-nature documentary, if you like. The French filmmaker Thomas Balmès fol lows four newborns from far-flung corners of the globe — a Namibian, a Mongolian, a Japanese, an American - from birth to rubber-legged ambulation. There is no commentary (nor are there subtitles for foreign tongues), so that we're left to draw our own conclusions. Inasmuch, however, as the evidence is highly anecdotal and arbitrary, any conclusions are probably better left undrawn. And the procession of Kodak Moments adds up to little more than a glossy coffee-table movie or glorified home video: a rooster hops up on the bed with the Mongolian, and a goat sneaks a sip from baby's bath water; the Namibian notices analytically that her older brother has a peepee where she has none; the petulant Japanese girl's tiny tantrums in a roomful of toys are intercut with the Mongolian happily playing with a roll of toilet paper (conclusions?). Each of the newborns also has a cat in the house, adding to the entertainment value, excepting the Namib ian, who has less entertaining dogs. At well under an hour and a half, the film won't wear out its welcome. 2010. ★★ (GASLAMP 15; LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

The Back-Up Plan — Jennifer Lopez, artificially inseminated and pregnant with twins before she meets Mr. Right, stands



out as a pearl among pebbles. Her hair and makeup (in the part of a pet-shop proprietor) are a wonder to behold, and are indeed beheld with tunnel vision and starry eves by director Alan Poul and photographer Xavier Pérez Grobet Her charm is unmissable if not irresistible, her talent as well-honed as it is narrow. And her biggest laugh, for sheer incongruity, comes when she explains how she knows the new man is The One: "He's very real." More truthfully, he's very ideal, a masculine accessory — second-tier Australian actor Alex O'Loughlin, a composite of Matthew McConaughey (torso) and Jon Stewart (head) — who will never compete for the spotlight, will mold himself into a devoted slave, will put up with nuttiness of any degree or duration, and will afterwards Always Be There For Her, like a favorite handbag. Not everything, needless to say, is roses: "I miss my old ass," the star plays up to, or rather down to, her fans: "It was kinda like this, but way hotter." Too, the public childbirth attended by members of the Single Mothers and Proud support group — not the heroine's childbirth but that of one of the pebbly supporting players - adds something new to the annals of parturition on screen, namely an unparalleled element of demonic possession. (The bowel movement has been paralleled. thank you.) Even outside of that, the movie achieves a level of biological repugnance to rival Ingmar Bergman, except with a sense of humor. A crude one. 2010. ★ (PALM PROMENADE 24)

Casino Jack and the United States of Money — The story of the rise and fall of Jack Abramoff, "the number one lobbyist in Washington," ranges far and wide (the Republican Revolution, the Mariana Islands, Angola, Hollywood, Indian casinos, Tom DeLay, John McCain), but the message stays single-track: the sellout of democracy, with clips of James Stewart in *Mr. Smith Goes to Washington* for instant nostalgia. It's a lot of talk (narration, interviews, TV broadcasts), and it takes a lot of effort to follow. Directed by Alex Gibney. 2010.

City Island — Amiable domestic comedy about a nuclear blue-collar family in which everyone's got a secret, and one's got several. Writer and director Raymond De Felitta orchestrates some lively passages of household discord, and he has set the action in a flavorful locale, a New England-y "fishing village" in the middle of the Bronx where lifelong residents go by the name of "clam-diggers" and outside transplants go by "mussel-suckers." The farcical finale is a bit uncomplicated in its resolution. Any viewer willing to entertain the rampant deception in the film ought to be willing to entertain a bit more mess at the end of it. The City of Your Final Destination — Reviewed this issue. With Omar Metwally, Charlotte Gainsbourg, Laura Linney, and Anthony Hopkins; directed by James Ivory. ★ (LA JOLLA VILLAGE, FROM 6/4)

Exit through the Gift Shop — Halfway engaging, halfway aggravating documentary on street art and its inevitable commercialization. Signed by the pseudonymous Banksy, a British graffiti artist who zealously guards his true identity ("The Scarlet Pimpernel of Street Art," as one newspaper headline puts it) and who appears here on screen wearing a hoodie in silhouette or with his face digitalized, the film ostensibly began as the work of Thierry Guetta, a muttonchopped French émigré who operated a vintage clothing store in L.A., became an obsessive amateur videographer, trained




The City of Your Final Destination — A Jamesian literary tale without the resonance.

his camera in particular on the activities of guerrilla artists, turned himself into one of them under the moniker of Mr. Brain Wash, and ostensibly edited his footage into an unreleasable mess, at which point Banksy ostensibly took over the project, utilizing and supplementing Guetta's footage, whipping it into the present shape. We must keep saying "ostensibly" because well, who knows? Anonymity is not a trustworthy persona for a documentarist. especially one with a prior reputation, a prior rap sheet, as a prankster. (Nor does the irony-dripping narration delivered by Rhys Ifans inspire much confidence.) Whatever the provenance or purpose, we have here a lot of footage of street artists in action, poor in quality but sufficient in quantity to enable us to gauge the range of cleverness, and to think our worst thoughts about the impact of money and hype in the art world. "Anthropologically, sociologically," remarks street artist Shepard Fairey, a/k/a Space Invader, who could be talking about the film itself, "it's a fascinating thing to observe." Artistically, aesthetically, it's a confounding thing. 2010.

Eventually the two investigators team up on the sketchier and shakier of the cases: the forty-year-old disappearance and presumed murder of a teenage girl whose body, on a sealed-off island, was never recovered. Mystery fans' alarm bells will begin ringing even before the girl's favorite uncle explains how she was in the habit of giving him an annual framed botanical and how he has continued annually to receive an anonymous framed botanical which he theorizes has been sent tauntingly by her killer. Kooky theory. Perhaps our indignity over the multiple revelations of ugly sexual violence is hoped to blind us to the shoddy plotting and the plodding development. (That, and perhaps also the cracklingly crisp photography.) But the would-be "touching" ending will





Mother and Child — Passable soap opera passed off as high and heavy drama. Writer-director Rodrigo García, who charted nine different and differing women in Nine Lives, has here cut down to a mere three. The connection between two of them is immediately clear, mother and child, more exactly the biological mother who at birth gave up the child for adoption thirty-seven years back. Both of these are individualized and unidealized women, two well-defended independents, the older one (Annette Bening) a prickly, persnickety, hypercritical physical therapist who does not make friends easily, or even conversation, and the younger one (Naomi Watts), her mother's daughter even though they have never known one another, a self-possessed, icy, blunt, upwardly mobile attorney -"I'm not in the sisterhood. I'm my own person" - with a penchant for reckless provocation. (Really, though, shouldn't there be some follow-up if she's going to slip off her panties in her neighbor's apartment and stow them in the dresser drawer of his pregnant wife?) The third one, a childless married African-American, has no apparent connection to the others, and although we may be confident that this storyline will sooner or later tie in, it feels in the meantime to be a bit of a drag, a third wheel, not least because the character is the most conventional and least intriguing: a tight-wound woman (Kerry Washington) whose sole fault is her overeagerness to adopt, given that the biological option isn't open to her. man Russell Crowe (Body of Lies, American Gangster, A Good Year, Gladiator, count 'em) won't satisfy your craving for the legend, but perhaps your craving, if any, for Dark Age dreariness, savage combat (shot in that skittery long-lens style that looks as if the film has slipped its sprockets), and egalitarian bombast. It takes two and a quarter hours for the hero to be branded an outlaw — as well as for the sun to break through the clouds — and by then the movie is over ("And so the legend begins") giving it the onerous and ominous feel of only Part One. More simply, the narrative feels padded, dillydallying, ill-framed; in a word, a "prequel," although all the familiar names are already present and accounted for, Friar Tuck, Little John, Will Scarlet, Alan A'Dayle, the Sheriff of Nottingham, and of course Marian, none of whom has much to do apart from the last one, who is now no maid but instead a war widow (a misguided Middle Eastern campaign, for timely relevance) and at the climax a comrade in arms, a proto-Joan of Arc, like Guinevere in the King Arthur of 2004. (The Age of Chivalry evidently ended before it commenced.) For all the scrupulously researched fidelity to period in the heaviness of costumes, crudeness of artifacts. grubbiness of hygiene, and so forth, the movie is sanctimoniously progressive in all political, social, sexual matters, a slight case of schizophrenia. The Secret in Their Eyes — From Argentina, an old-fashioned slick manipulative commercial entertainment that took home the Oscar for foreign film. Firm-footed, smooth-surfaced, it centers on a retired public prosecutor struggling to write a novel on a nagging twenty-year-old case, the rape and murder of a newlywed schoolteacher. Generating suspense partly through its covness as to the outcome of that case, the film shuttles between two time zones, then and now, plainly signalling the period by way of the relative blackness or gravness of the beard and hair of the leading man, Ricardo Darín, a masterly underplayer, a shrewd economizer, a dignified sublimator, once you get past his constant look of acid indigestion. In addition to Darín's tormented hero, the film is filled with well-drawn characters: his alluring but seemingly unattainable new boss (Soledad Villamil), still at work - now a judge and still alluring twenty-odd years after the murder case; his erratic alcoholic colleague; the sarcastic tyrannical department head; the self-aggrandizing policeman; the obsessed husband of the victim; and, when

at length he turns up, the hateful perpetrator. The sturdy storyline braids together a number of complementary strands - the unravelling of a mystery, for starters, with flashes of psychological and philosophical insight worthy of Simenon; political corruption (but of course) and abuse of power; unrequited love; the regrets of advanced age - en route to a satisfying if unsurprising surprise ending. In mid-April, senior Iranian cleric Ayatollah Kazem Sedighi issued a warning that recent earthquakes in Haiti, Chile, and elsewhere were caused by women's loose sex and immodest dress. Immediately, Jennifer McCreight responded on Facebook by urging women worldwide to dress provocatively on April 26 to create "boobquake" and test the cleric's theory. At least 90,000 women promised they would reveal serious cleavage on that date. On April 26, following a several-day drought of earthquakes, a quake measuring 6.5 on the Richter scale hit just south of Taiwan. (Slight advantage to the ayatollah, since a Purdue University seismologist observed that a 6.5 quake was not uncommon for that region.)

Cultural Diversity

- One of the world's longest-running TV comedy shows (according to an April Reuters dispatch from South Korea) is the weekly North Korean production It's So Funny, with its undynamic format of a man and a woman in military uniforms talking to each other (though they sometimes sing and dance). The latest episode "extolled the virtue of beans," wrote the Reuters stringer, "while avoiding any flatulence humor." "If we soldiers see beans, we become happy," said the man, leading both

hosts to laugh. According to Reuters, "The two talk about how bean-fed North Korean soldiers were able to fight off U.S. imperialist troops during the Korean war."

Latest Religious Messages

- John Ridgeway, 45, filed a federal falseimprisonment lawsuit in March based on his 2005 trial over a traffic charge. According to a report in Michigan's Bay City Times, just before the jury returned with a verdict, Ridgeway opened a vial of oil, rubbed some on his fingers and then around the defense table, and he later shook hands with court personnel. Ridgeway was arrested when the prosecutor, a bailiff, and the ticketing police officer became ill. Ridgeway explained that the virgin olive oil had been blessed by a Colorado pastor, specifically to "cast evil" from government facilities.

- In March, leaders of the St. John's Lutheran Church in Baraboo, Wis., voted to fire the principal of its elementary and middle school because of his "question[ing] the church's teachings." The church had held a contentious meeting of members on March 21, but few spoke out for the principal, largely because female members were banned from speaking at all. (According to the Baraboo News Republic, women cannot vote on the church's business but generally are allowed to talk at meetings until now.)

Questionable Judgments

Under Britain's Department of Health guidelines, prisoners about to be released who had previously taken drugs but cured their addiction while incarcerated are being purposefully re-addicted by wardens, using methadone. According to researchers, the former addicts will then be less likely to overdose when they get back on the street. Reportedly, more than 460 prisoners have thus been "retoxified" in the last five years.

- Australia family court judge Robert Benjamin ruled in March that sisters aged 10 and 8 must spend weekends with their father even though he is a convicted sex offender with a child-porn habit. The judge attached the restrictions that Dad must install a lock on the girls' bedroom door that he cannot control, and if the girls stay overnight, the father must have "an adult friend" spend the night, too, so that Dad will be less likely to offend.

More Unlicensed Parents

- Delmer Doss, 19, and his girlfriend, Amber Burgess, 19, were arrested in Stanley, N.C., in February on child-abuse charges after police found a video made by the couple of their

11-month-old son. The toddler was blindfolded, and the parents were shown laughing at him, over and over, as he bumped into walls and fell down.

- In March in Dallas, Krystal Gardner, 28, confronting a repo man driving off with her SUV, tossed her 1-year-old baby through an open window to stop the moving vehicle. At that point, the repo man stopped and got out, but moments later, a teenager emerged from Gardner's house and began firing a 12-gauge shotgun.

Fetishes on Parade

- A 27-year-old man reported to Oklahoma City police in April that he was sexually assaulted by a man who had perhaps misunderstood the first man's intentions. According to a story in The Oklahoman, the first man had fully disclosed his "fetish for flatulence," but when the two met, the hijinks were interrupted by the second man's tying up and sexually assaulting the first man. The first man said he wanted only for the second man to "fart for me." The first man's name was not disclosed because he claimed to be the victim of a sex crime.
