



# **Get Used to Unemployment**

The U.S. has lost more than 8 million jobs since the Great Recession began in late 2007. San Diego County has lost more

than 80,000. They aren't coming back soon, say local economists. A high unemployment rate may be the new reality in the U.S. and San Diego.

During the doldrums, San Diego has done better than California but worse than the nation. The local unemployment rate soared from 4 percent in 2006 to a high of 11.1 percent in January of this year — the highest rate in 50 years. In June, San Diego's rate of 10.5 percent compared with the nation's 9.6 percent and California's 12.2. But

San Diego's increase from 10.1 percent in May was larger than the May–June increase for both the state and nation.


On the surface, San Diego's employment should evince some stability, points out Kelly Cunningham, chief economist for the National University System Institute for Policy Research. The ten largest employers are either the government or nonprofit health-care facilities whose employment tends to be more stable over time. Last year, according to

the Daily Transcript's San Diego Source, the top ten employers were the federal government, state government, University of California San Diego, County of San Diego, U.S. Navy (both uniformed and civilian personnel), City of San Diego, San Diego Unified School District, Sharp HealthCare, Scripps Health, and Scripps Mercy Hospital (combined with Scripps Mercy Chula Vista).

In 11th place was Qualcomm, followed by Kaiser Foundation Hospital, San Diego State University, and the U.S. Postal Service. That's one private-sector firm out of the 14 biggest employers.

While governments and nonprofits may lend some stability, their jobs won't rise significantly unless the population grows, and that's a problem. Cunningham predicts that San Diego population, which in halcyon years would go up around 3 percent annually, will rise 1 percent this year and 0.9 percent next year.

In 2010, the population will go up 31,500. About 14,000 will come from international immigration and 26,500 from natural increase (births

minus deaths). But 9000 will depart San Diego for other communities. "People are actually moving away from San Diego. The main reason is lack of jobs and the prohibitive cost of living," says Cunningham.

That can be demonstrated statistically. According to the Council for Community and Economic Research, San Diego's cost of living is 32.3 percent above the national average. Among 22 major metro areas, the only places with a higher cost of living are San Francisco (62.1 percent above the national average), Los Angeles (36.2), Washington D.C. (37.9), and Manhattan (118.0). San Diego compares poorly with other high-tech areas such as Austin, Charlotte, Orlando, and Raleigh, whose living costs are all below the national average. San Jose (Silicon Valley), at 55 percent above the national norm, is the most expensive of the tech centers.

San Diego's average household income is barely above the nation's: \$69,000 in 2008 versus the U.S.'s \$63,000. So San Diegans get the squeezeroo — moderate incomes and a high cost of living.

The San Diego Association of Governments has done a study showing that over the past 35 years, San Diegans' inflation-adjusted personal income has grown at 1 percent a year. That's half the national rate of 2 percent over the same period. There have been two reasons for this income lag: "the type of jobs and the relatively high rate of inflation, driven by home prices," says Marney Cox, chief economist of the association.

Back in the 1970s, the high proportion of government jobs pushed the income average lower, but in the past 10 to 15 years, government salaries have gone steadily upward while private-sector pay has done poorly, says Cox. Now, the low-paying jobs holding down San Diego are in such private-sector areas as tourism, he says.

Over the 35 years, "There have been eight jobs generated in the bottom third [of income] for every one in the top third," says Cox.

Is it any wonder people are leaving San Diego and its high cost of living and high taxes?

One of the most important reasons for current job weakness is the real estate bust, says Cunningham. In 2008, an amazing 20.1 percent of the San Diego

area's economic output was in real estate sales and administration. That made San Diego the nation's third most real estate-intensive metro area, behind Orlando and Miami. Construction jobs would add another 4 percentage points, so before the collapse, real estate amounted to almost one-fourth of the San Diego economy. Real estate prices have plunged 35 percent since peaking in late 2005 and at one point were down more than 40 percent; they have been coming up in recent months but could begin dropping again as government housing stimulus programs are phased out. It will be many years before commercial and residential real estate get back to their old heights.

The military, which has always been a big part of the economy, "will probably slacken a bit with the drawdown of military spending," says Cunningham. Research jobs in tech, biotech, and telecom are holding up well, but some of those jobs are going to countries such as India and China. "I always thought the smart people wanted to live here, but now biotechs are finding they can do that kind of research for much lower expenses" in foreign countries, he says.

## **Everything Old Is Renewed Again**

ochelle Becker would like to correct me. I wrote in a June 17 article that the two remaining reactors at the San Onofre

Nuclear Generating Station, located in the northwest corner of San Diego County, were scheduled to go offline in 2022.

But she had a hunch that this wouldn't happen. And on July 26, she saw further evidence — a document filed with the state's Public Utilities Commission that San Onofre's operator intends to renew the plant's two licenses.

Becker, who has a vacation home in Pacific Beach, lives in Grover Beach, ten planning and construction stages of the state's two nuclear power plants. In 2006, the state legislature directed the California Energy Commission to produce a report assessing the vulnerability of San Onofre and Diablo Canyon to earthquakes and plant aging. The concern was not public safety — nuclear power plant safety is not within the state's jurisdiction — but the effect that an earthquake would have on California's power sup-

two units do not expire until 2024 and 2025, and the seismic studies had not even begun.

How does that work? The federal commission has jurisdiction over nuclear power generation in the United States, but it does not consider seismic hazards during license renewal. "PG&E just said, as well just get your rubber stamp out for San Onofre," Becker says. "There have been 59 license renewals around the country, and there's really no difference between the plants in California and those 59 facilities, other than ours are sitting on earthquake faults."

Wait, on earthquake faults?

In November 2008, she says, the Energy Commission was meeting to adopt the final recommendations for its report. "PG&E, at the meeting that day, said, 'Oh, we found another earthquake fault. This one's 1800 feet from the plant."

The consultant report, from which the Energy Commission drew its final report, says, "[T]he occurrence of an earthquake directly beneath Diablo Canyon...is possible."

Down the coast in San Diego, the Cristiano fault passes within half a mile of San Onofre. The fault is considered inactive, however, as it "is overlain by undisturbed marine deposits that have been dated as 125,000 years old," says the consultant report. Several active faults run near San Onofre: the Whittier-Elsinore, 23 miles to the east; the San Jacinto, 43 miles northeast; and the southern San Andreas, 57 miles to the northeast.

miles from California's other nuclear facility, the Diablo Canyon Power Plant. She is executive director of the Alliance for Nuclear Responsibility, based in nearby San Luis Obispo. Her group is interested in the Diablo Canyon relicensing process, especially in light of an earthquake fault line discovered near the plant in 2008.

In early July, I sat down with Becker, who supplied me before our conversation with volumes of literature on nuclear power and its reception in California, dating back to the original

ply. Completed in 2008, the report recommended that both nuclear plants do seismic studies employing state-of-the-art technologies — three-dimensional seismic reflection mapping and global positioning system technology — before seeking license renewal with the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Instead, two days before Thanksgiving 2009, and in defiance of every state agency with energy authority, Diablo Canyon's operator, Pacific Gas & Electric, filed for renewal. The current licenses of the plant's 'Forget it. We're just going to file for renewal with the NRC and let the chips fall where they may." The seismic studies at Diablo Canyon aren't scheduled to be completed until sometime in 2013. According to Becker, the commission has said that the license extension could be granted by next year.

The Alliance for Nuclear Responsibility has urged the federal regulatory body to review thoroughly the relicensing pros and cons at Diablo.

"If we don't prevail at Diablo Canyon, you might

# History Repeats Itself

Famed Director Werner Herzog Remakes His Classic Film Aguirre, The Wrath of God; Sets Story in Modern-Day San Diego

FORMER SILK STALKINGS SOUNDSTAGE, NATIONAL CITY: If at first you don't succeed, try, try again — as long as you can get the financing.



Fresh off his gargantuan flop remaking Abel Ferrara's 1992 cult classic Bad Lieutenant as the Nicolas Cage-starring head trip *The Bad Lieutenant*: Port of Call - New Orleans (\$2 million domestic gross on a \$25 million budget), famed German director Werner Herzog has announced his intention to remake his own 1972 cult classic Aguirre, the Wrath of God as the Mike Aguirre-starring conspiracy thriller Aguirre, the Wrath of Mike. And in a move that might merit a conspiracy thriller of its own, he has convinced the San Diego Board of Tourism to help him fund it.

"The first *Aguirre*," explains Herzog, "was the story of one

man's descent into madness as he sought to do the impossible — penetrate the unforgiving and perilous Amazon jungle and discover El Dorado,

the legendary city of

gold. Though it is a work of my fevered and yet dispassionate imagination, I based the story on a historical figure: the Spanish soldier Lope de Aguirre. Recently, while checking the Wikipedia entry on my film for any pranksterish inaccuracies - a chore I find tiresome but absolutely necessary for my artistic integrity — I chanced upon the entry for [former city attorney] Mike Aguirre - another historical figure! As I read, the parallels

proved too striking to resist. The lush locale, the impossible quest to penetrate the deadly bureaucratic jungle and discover America's Finest City, the mad grab for power, and the ultimate descent into madness, proclaiming one's greatness to a pack of monkeys. Though the production of the original had been a harrowing nightmare, I knew I had to try again. I am like an Old Testament prophet, repeating my message of doom and destruction again and again, in the vain hope that it will be heard and heeded. Also, you know, I was already in town for My Son, My Son, What Have Ye Done."

ing as a lawyer with the firm Aguirre, Morris & Stevenson, Aguirre himself was only too happy to take on the task of playing himself in the film's lead role. "I still believe that my cause was just," he told *SD on the QT*, "and while my efforts proved maddening and ultimately futile, I appreciate Mr. Herzog giving me the chance to get my story on film. Plus, I totally loved *Rescue Dawn*."

The real coup for Herzog, however, was the securing of over \$4 million from the San Diego Board of Tourism to aid in the film's financing. A spokesman for the board declined to comment aside from spitting on the ground and scowling at the mention of Aguirre's name, but after a couple of Stone IPAs, Herzog was willing to shed some light on his good fortune. "It is a classic testament to the power of art to simultaneously condemn

and flatter. Aguirre is happy to get his story told. The board is happy to show Aguirre talking to monkeys. And Herzog is happy to make his movie. We start principal photography in a week."

## STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

Mattzilla:

I've looked at a lot of career choices, and it seems to me that being a vampire would suit me pretty well. One thing has me a little confused, though. Could I survive as a vampire by just drinking blood? Do vampires eat cheeseburgers and spaghetti and stuff like that, or does blood have all they need to live?

Oh, we'll get letters. Lotsa in-theknow vampire letters saying we're completely wrong and what do we know about vampires, anyway. But you asked, we'll answer, picking our vampire facts on little slips of white paper, out of a hat. In the vampire world, it's all the same,

Before we get to the vampire food pyramid, can we ask how you plan to become vampiric? Current deep thinkers on the subject seem to agree that you need the bite of a vampire to do the trick. Some say that

transmits a vampire virus that gets into your DNA. Then the biter becomes mentor to the bitee. On the other hand, there's a minority opinion that you have to be born that way. That actually goes back to the old-school theories about where vampires come from. Most of them make being bitten look like the easy route.

In olden times, to return from the dead as a vampire, a person during his lifetime should have been a violent or cruel person, a criminal, a flouter of religious laws, a witch, a wizard, a werewolf or victim thereof, or a suicide. Some, they said, were born vampiric the bastard child of bastards, the seventhborn child, a blue-eyed red-headed tyke, or a newborn with a harelip, tail, or other physical

So, assuming we've taken care of the getting-to-be-a-vampire stuff, how do you sustain yourself? Is blood packed with nutrition, or do we need vitamin supplements? Food energy: human blood contains 700 calories per liter. The average human needs maybe 2000 calories per day to keep things chugging along. That means three liters of blood a day just for energy. But are there enough essential micronutrients available in blood? This will be highly variable. In the worst case, consider vitamin C, not stored in the body so it must be renewed frequently. The average person has about 5 milligrams per liter of C floating around. The World Health Organization rec-

ommends you maintain a level of 45 milligrams. To be sure you're getting that, you'd need nine liters of blood. Whoa! In the process, you're downing 3500 calories a day. Shortly, you'll be very corpulent, certainly counter to the common perception of a dandy vampire.

Got iron? Need 26 liters of blood per day to meet your RDA, even though blood is generally high in iron.

So there you are, slamming back the blood, completely unaware of the biggest hidden danger: salt. If there's one thing human blood has, it's lots of salt. Nine grams per liter. Even if you drink your minimum three liters daily, you'll be getting nearly five times the recommended amount of salt. If you drink enough water to counteract it, you'll still end up with hypertension. If you ignore water, you'll go all dehydrated, leading straight to kidney failure, straight to death (again, I guess). So,

counting on blood to keep you humming seems like a risky bet.

Luckily, many in the nowadays vampire nation don't believe vampires suck blood for food. The object is to the essence, the vital being, the soul of the victim. Then three squares a day keep your body going. And since nouveau-vampires are even sympathetic characters, perhaps we'll have a whole rash of vegan vampires, biting their way through your garden.

## Unstoppable



The UFL is creepy with investment bankers, including Nancy Pelosi's husband-manservant Paul.

t's a strange-weird sight to raise binoculars and look out to a vast boneyard of dead professional football leagues. And weirder still to see, over there, in the far distance, a file of new professional football leagues marching lockstep into the same boneyard.

There have been four American Football Leagues, two Arena Football Leagues, one af2 league, a Continental Football League, Continental Indoor Football League, American Professional Football League, Indoor Football League, Indoor Professional Football League, Professional Indoor Football League, Professional Spring Football League, USFL, World Football League, XFL, and many, many others, including at least six women's professional football leagues. Oh, and three new professional football leagues (male, two outdoor, one indoor) are scheduled to begin play next year. Everybody goes broke or struggles to make gas money and still they come on.

The question is, why would anyone invest in a professional football league? Why not put your savings into transistor radios? By way of an answer, let me introduce the 2010 United Football League (UFL).

You say, "UFL, so what." Well, other than the NFL, they are the only professional, outdoor, fall season, nationally televised football league we've got. True, they're televised on Versus, HD-Net, and that powerhouse up-and-comer New England Sports Network, but that's enough to reach a national audience. The UFL plays in the fall. They are a professional league: players earn \$50,000 for an eight-week season, more if they play in their championship game.

The UFL season opens in the midst of the college football season, the NFL season, baseball playoffs and World Series, start of the NBA season, start of the NHL season, finish of NASCAR Sprint Cup...in other words, the UFL competes with every big-time sport the country has to offer. Big-time sports don't seem to notice.

Here's a bit of background. Original UFL

investors are William Hambrecht, founder of WR Hambrecht + Company, an investment banking firm (he owns the Las Vegas franchise); Paul Pelosi, husband and manservant to Nancy Pelosi (speaker of the House of Representatives) and owner of venture capital firm Financial Leasing Services (and the Sacramento franchise); and Bill Mayer, founder of Park Avenue Equity (he owns the Hartford franchise). Then, there is Silicon Valley boy Zach Nelson, owner of NetSuite (and front man for the Omaha franchise). Finally, the league owns the Florida franchise. I'm counting three investment bankers owning three teams in a five-team league. Another owner is a business buddy, and nobody owns the fifth franchise. The league is creepy with investment bankers.

Many believe the UFL was put in place on the cheap (last year the league had one general manager for all four teams) with the sole purpose to be in place when the NFL locks out its players in 2011. That lockout is very likely to happen, by the way.

It's hard (well, impossible, really) to imagine the UFL would have the muscle to buy up enough players and establish enough franchises to threaten NFL World if the lockout comes to pass. The UFL will get some shake *if* the NFL goes dark, but that begs the question, how long are you willing to watch Philip Rivers quarterback the Laredo Border Patrolmen?

Last year the UFL had four teams and put two of them in NFL markets playing in bigleague stadia (San Francisco and New York); two teams played in big non-NFL markets with big stadia — Las Vegas (Sam Boyd Stadium) and Orlando (Citrus Bowl). TV numbers were below modest, attendance was abysmal.

This year they've moved two teams to smaller, non-NFL markets (San Francisco to Sacramento, New York to Hartford) and added an expansion team in Omaha. Las Vegas and Orlando franchises stayed put. (The league has granted a conditional franchise for a team in Norfolk, Virginia, and it's scheduled to play next year.)

In 2009, the UFL was able to sign well-known NFL coaches, which may tell us more about NFL coaches than we want to know. There were a few bottom-feeding NFL players on UFL rosters (I'm thinking of J.P. Losman and Tim Rattay). This year, Daunte Culpepper and Jeff Garcia are the big ex-NFL names.

What surprised me most last year was the quality of play. Even a sub-low-budget-miniseason-pro-league was able to prove — at least to me — that there are enough skilled players around to populate another NFL-type professional football league. I watched four or five games, attended two. The UFL is better than college football, better then CFL football, and better than the XFL ever was. This, on no money and bad publicity. Strange.

The UFL season begins on September 18. Regular season ends November 20; the championship game follows on November 26. Check ufl-football.com for particulars.

# T. G. I. F.

### I look like some effeminate flake composing a sensitive poem.

This last full week of August promises to resemble summer to some degree, but that would be divination, I suppose, as I'm writing this a full week earlier. "Promises"; this reminds me of a blurb on a Raymond Chandler novel that may have been from Chandler himself or, if not, it was certainly meant to sound like him — and it did: "Southern California, where the sun makes a promise it breaks every night." Pretty good, it's up there with

a classic Chandlerism from *Farewell, My Lovely*: "He had a face like a collapsed lung."

My time is rarely my own these days, so I make the most of it with the fictions of others that I put on like a suit of clothes worn only for an hour or two a day. At the moment I'm living in *Kingdoms of the Wall* by Robert Silverberg, a majestic and mythopoeic vision of life on what could only be a Jovian planet where every-

I've written about Silverberg here in the past, and for anyone still unprejudiced by the objectionable term "sci-fi" and who leans toward the rubric of "Speculative Fiction," you would likely find this writer's stuff (written since 1970 or so) gratifying.

It is improbable that I will be commenting on, much less participating in, any kind of weekend nightlife for the immediate future not that I was ever much good at it anyway. I reckon I could be relied upon for descriptions of the play of sporadic headlights on my ceiling at 4 a.m., though it hardly seems fertile ground for lively writing. The same could be said for any accounts of my distracted and pointless navel-gazing at that time of night, though it would, of course, enrich your life, I'm sure. Example: "I'm past the halfway point of my 60th year. How did I allow this to happen, and why wasn't I consulted about this two weeks ago when I was 35? Don't let this happen to you."

A two-word phrase has crept into common usage lately: "Real quick." I first heard this in hospitals as in, "The doctor will be in to talk to you. He just has to do this quadruple bypass real quick." Now it is everywhere, as in, "I'm almost ready for lunch, let me just build this nuclear power plant real quick." Or how about, "Ready for Monday morning?"

"Yeah, let me just do this weekend real quick."

It is now up there with "No worries" and "At the end of the day."

I just received an email from Thailand. It was from Ken Minahan, a guitarist I played with in two different bands from 1968 to 1971. He sent some pictures as well, one of them of our '68-'69 group Faith (when Blind Faith came out we decided to drop it in favor of It Doesn't Matter, known in the Tri-State areas of Illinois, Wisconsin, and Iowa as IDM). The photo is a good one, far better than I remembered: we look like Buffalo Springfield meets Traffic, and everyone except me looks like a fairly serious musician. We were, actually, it's just that

I remember the photographer told me to "look up toward the ceiling." I did, and the result was I look like some effeminate flake composing a sensitive poem entitled "Crimson is my Wisket." Thanks, Kenny. That was fun. I see you're called "Snowman" in Thailand. I get it, you kind of look like one. Just kidding. You look good, you look good.

My professional careers since the age of 15 have been musi-

cian, writer, and bartender (with several unprofitable side trips as a bookseller), so I don't see how I could have developed such bad habits. Still, there it is. Much to undo.

Speaking of which, this trip through rehab seems to be clicking on previously clickless points along the way. Certain scales, as it were, have fallen from my eyes, and I can now see how heretofore unfathomable screwups came about. Not all of them but some of them; more, it is said, will be revealed. Still, I think I'm right about certain episodes I may have nailed. The strongest evidence of this is the feeling of thorough discomfort when I think of those periods preceding the horror. I may not be entirely clear here. Feel free to sue me.

I feel like I'm struggling NOT to channel Andy Rooney. He's probably not even dead, for all I know, still... "Did you ever notice how movies suck in the summer? None of them have Andy Griffith in them. And by the way, where is the *Matlock: The Movie* we were promised?" Turn to the ads in the Movie Review and Guide section and tell me it's not slim pickings.





**T**he kids have been begging to go to Comic-Con for years. This year I yielded, on the condition that we seek out age-appropriate offerings.

After 30 minutes of swimming through an ocean of people decked out as everything from Ghostbusters to Wonder Woman and pushing past booths featuring busty fairies and scenes of epic carnage, I happened upon the happy realm of Don't Eat Any Bugs Productions (donteatanybugs.

net). There I spoke with Ray Friesen, creator of such titles as Cupcakes of Doom!

"I do zany stuff,"
said Friesen, "but
it's kid-friendly.
No monsters or
anything like that.
Cupcakes of Doom!
involves a clash between
pirates and Vikings to decide the fate of a kingdom, with

baked goods as the weapon of choice. Another of my stories has Melville the Penguin in a race to save exploding cheese from a horde of ninja chickens. I put crazy things together and try to make it funny."

And educational. "I'll visit schools...I tell stories and draw cartoons. I teach cartooning. I like to emphasize that the kids can use cartooning to tell their own stories — draw the story in pictures and then add words.

The drawing seems to free them up; it's a way for them to express ideas and be creative. My website has fun sheets that show kids how to draw Melville, and there's a comic sheet they can print out that has blank speech bubbles for them to write what they want."

Before I left, I picked up a sampler comic book of Friesen's work (\$2), which contains excerpts from titles such as *Yarg!* A few steps later I stopped to gawk at a Gargamel-sized Papa Smurf. Nostalgia for many wasted childhood hours in front of the TV drew me closer, and I wound up at the Papercutz booth listening to editorial associate Michael Petranek.

"The Smurfs started out as a French comic book by Peyo. We've translated these new graphic novels from the original texts. The first is *The Purple Smurf*, which reintroduces the characters. One Smurf gets bitten by a strange fly, and that leads to an epidemic that turns the Smurfs purple. The second is actually the first comics story that ever featured the Smurfs: *The Smurfs and the Magic Flute*. The books, hardcover or paperback, will be

available in September, but you can get a preview comic in stores for \$1."

As I pressed on, I ran into booths for Jeff Smith's graphic novel *Bone* and David Petersen's *Mouse Guard*. Both were gorgeous — and, apparently, kid-friendly. While I didn't get to speak to the creators, the next day I

put in a call to Comickaze in Clairemont Mesa (858-278-0371; com-

ickazeonline.webs.com) to speak about those titles with owner Robert Scott.

"I think *Bone* is appropriate for any kid of almost any age," said Scott. "There are some elements with monsters that might be scary, but no more so than Pinocchio being swallowed by a whale. It tells the story of the three

Bone brothers and their many adventures. We have the Bible-sized complete *Bone* saga in black-and-white [\$40] and the more recent printings of the separate volumes from Scholastic [\$10-\$13 each]. They're in full color, and they look really nice."

As for *Mouse Guard*: "It's set in the Robin Hood era, but all the characters are animals. That was the premise David Petersen started out with, but he found he had the most

fun writing about the mice. So the

about this group of mice that protect their shire — the Mouse Guard. Sort of like the Three Musketeers. The style is more fine art than *Bone*, which is more like a cartoon. The series is still being published. It's

### HILLCREST THE MOTION PICTURE

unday, August 8, 1:30 p.m. The 26th annual CityFest sees a bustling Fifth Avenue blocked off to vehicle traffic from University to Brookes with 250-plus vendors, 150,000-plus attendees, and lines extending out the door of every bar on the block. The street fair, organized by the Hillcrest Business Association, is a celebration of the Hillcrest sign, which was originally put up in 1940. Over the years, the sign fell into disrepair and was taken down in 1983, until community members raised over \$4000 to restore and relight the iconic marker on August 26, 1984. Every year since, the community has gathered for a symbolic relighting of the sign in order to celebrate this unique and vibrant San Diego neighborhood.

San Diego's "Queen of Boogie Woogie," Sue Palmer, plays the main stage on University to a crowd of khaki-shorted middleagers, babies on shoulders in weed-wacker earmuffs, scantily clad dudes with tattoos and nipple piercings, and women in summer dresses shaking hips on the intersection pavement. Amid vendors of Eastern knickknacks, shaved ice, psychic services, funnel cake, lawn gnomes, hippie garb, Egyptian bed sheets, pickled garlic, reflexology,

bacon-wrapped hotdogs, vegan propaganda, luchador masks, and brotein powder, an elderly woman in a wheelchair plays "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" on the violin while Equality California volunteers recruit supporters with talk of the Supreme Court and the-fight's-notover-yet.

At Fifth and Brookes, kids and parents decorate paper bags

> "Wait a minute! My husband and I are having a moment!"

with ribbons and glitter at the Rad Hatter tent. A DJ plays "Everybody Dance Now" as a nauseating carnival ride spins in the sunshine. The Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence, a self-described "leading-edge order of queer nuns," roam the streets laughing in white face paint and custom nun habits. A Michael Jackson impersonator snaps photos with smiling passers-by and a man with a fanny pack says, "One dollar, that's one dollar, please!"

I go for a cocktail at the sweaty, shirtless dungeon of the Brass Rail. "I've always wanted to live in San Diego," Robert tells me on the patio. He just moved to University Heights from Ann Arbor, Michigan, which he describes as "the seat of liberalism." "It used to be a \$5 fine for possession of marijuana," Robert says. "Now it's up to \$25."

Around 6 p.m. at the stage, **Burning of Rome front man Adam** looks like a roque Boy Scout in green shorts, tall red socks, and Black Flag T-shirt. Famous for their anarchic stage presence, I wonder what Adam and barefoot guitarist Joe will find to swing

on and fall off of this time. A few songs in, Joe breaks one of the decorative Styrofoam skulls over his head, tossing the jaw over his shoulder. Joe and Adam leap into the audience, writhing on the pavement while drunk middleaged couples take photos with the busted skull.

I have a couple Eel River Acai beers at Pizza Fusion and then hit the beer garden, where the San

**Diego Drinking Team** chugs Coors and girls toss softballs at the Dunk a Drag tank.

"Let's put our hands together for Judge Walker for overturning Prop. 8," says county supervisor Ron Roberts. Instead of relighting the sign this year, Roberts, city councilmember Todd Gloria, congresswoman Susan Davis, and MC Laura Jane introduce Hillcrest the Motion Picture, a film depicting revelers at the local bars, the art walk the farmers' market, and clips of the day's celebration.

My roommate Mar cus and I go for soup a Pho Fifth Avenue. The

bathroom door is locked and from inside a man says, "Wait a minute! My husband and I are having a moment!"





than a downtown club" for a flat fee. "You have to read the crowd." (The fee thing is based largely on reputation — the more likely your name is to pull a crowd, the more vou command. A newbie downtown might get less than \$200, a genuine celebrity DJ, \$2000.)

Just now, Felt1 is reading his track list, spinning a knob on the right-hand mixer to scroll through the near-endless song list on his laptop screen. (The songs are arranged by beats per minute- a standard

evening might start out at around 78 bpm and finish up around 120. Smooth mixing requires that you build slowly, gently drawing the crowd along.) Over on the left, DJ Neil Armstrong is working through a longish set he's been away, and this is his welcome-back night. His cuts are frequent and dramatic, often with a heavy, even scratch busting in between songs. (A note on the scratching: once upon a time, DJs played records, grooved vinyl discs that delivered analog sound when you

ran a needle along the groove. Now they spin vinyl discs that deliver a control signal to the mixer. You place the needle at the edge of the disc, and the rotation starts whatever mp3 vou've got cued up on your Scratch Live software from the beginning. Scratching, once the natural result of pulling a disc back to cue it up, has become a digital sound effect. But a very good one. The delay between hand-motion and registered sound is split-second, almost unnoticeable.)



over top of the songs themselves. The bodies on the floor start to come unstuck and really move.

It's a very different scene when Felt1 plays the downtown club On Broadway. Under the high, ornamented beams of the ceiling, it's all untucked dress shirts on the men and short. stretchy dresses on the ladies. Somebody works a light show from up in a balcony, and a hostess in fishnets and a black bustier hauls big bottles of high-end vodka and stacks of glasses over to guests willing to pay for a table and bottle service. (This much is the same: it's freaking loud.) The DI works alone in a booth well above the parquet dance floor, sipping a Grey Goose and cranberry brought to him by a promoter. "There are something like six

promoters here," Felt1 explains. "Some promoters just Facebook all day to get people to come down to the club, or they walk around and pass out flyers. They have nothing to do with the music." That's what they hire DJs like Felt1 for.

But Felt1 has to play to the crowd, and what this crowd wants is what's on the radio. "From ten to ten-thirty, I'll do all radio," he tells me. "I've been doing all right, but I'll also throw in 'Billie Jean,' see what they do. Once, some girl came up to me and asked, 'When are you gonna play some good music?' I was playing 'Human Nature'!" (At the moment, he's blaring the Z-Trip remix of the Jackson Five's "I Want You Back.") Still, the playlist runs to the familiar: Kid Cudi making Lady Gaga sound dirty

when she sings "Poker face" as "Poke-her-face," Mariah Carey, LL Cool J, 50 Cent, Eve. Oh, and Kinfolk Kia Shine's "So Krispy," which I seem to hear wherever I go. That and Trey Songz' "Say Aah."

The dance might as well be in a high school gym; the social dynamics seem pretty much the same. A single lady in booty shorts and a black tank top faces the DJ and works it hard and slow call her the Constant. Over at the edge, two dudes face each other and hop around for a minute or two, mugging. One of them manages to approach the Constant; they gyrate against each other briefly, and then he disappears. A single white female in a kicky dress moseys out and starts a tentative shuffle. The Constant finds her

and they dance, but Constant scares her off with a flirty touch to the back. We finally get a proper couple, but they're both holding their drinks, and that slows them down. Five petite Asians with bare legs and heels of varying heights emerge from the restroom and begin to cross the floor. They stop, dance a little, take each others' pictures, and start working their cell phones. The bass hits like missiles, the lights flash like bombs. Eventually, I count a dozen women out on the floor — and no men. They sit at the tables, nursing their beers and taking in the show. For the DJ, it's enough.

DJ Felt1 is DJ Felt1 because he came to the music part of hip-hop through the art part of hip-hop: paint work. "Felt is like 'felt-tip

marker.' I was doing full murals; it got to the point where people didn't even know my real name. I lived near Morse, but I knew if I went there, I probably wouldn't graduate. It was too close to home, and all of my friends were ditching. So I chose to go to University City. My brother started DJing in '86," when Felt1 was ten years old, "and I was the little brother who rolled with him. I started in '89, playing as a hobby. This was when hip-hop was fresh, so there were no lines on what you could and couldn't do. I even tried rapping, but it wasn't my thing. That's when I started with the art. My ninth-grade art teacher said I had a good eye for it."

University City offered classes in graphic design, and that led to

a graphic-art school in Denver. "But when I came back, I couldn't find any work. I took whatever I could find, club flyers, stuff like that." Around this time, he hooked up with an store on F Street downtown. There used to be four locations, including one in Tokyo, and they used to sell a lot of vintage vinyl. But then, you know, digital. These days, it's mostly hats



I'd make deals with club promoters — 'I can do your flyers for free; just pay me to DJ." Today, he still designs shirts for Armory Survival Gear and also works at the Armory

and T-shirts and DVDs of the company's freestyle DJ sessions, which started in the Chula Vista YMCA before going international and moving to L.A. Oh, and spray paint, customdesigned for graffiti artists. "The pressure in the can is lower, so the paint comes out slower," explains Felt1. "You get cleaner lines. I probably did my last work about three months ago."

airbrush technique." Enchanted, Pacman set out to become a hip-hop artist. "A lot of people have mistaken hip-hop, the actual subculture, for rap. But when I moved from National City to Paradise Hills in elementary school, I just saw it as what people did in the neighborhood. It influences how you walk, how you dress, how you talk. When people said, 'That's wack,' that's just what people said."

The music was just part of the scene. "I think hip-hop artists grab from the environment and translate it into how they see or feel" techno, house, rap, etc. "I was just in love with the music, the beats when you heard it, it made you feel a certain way." Then Run-D.M.C. broke out on television in '85, and Pacman realized he was part of a thing. And then, on "The Magnificent Jazzy Jeff," the Fresh Prince asked DJ Jazzy Jeff to make the record sound like a bird, and Pacman realized he wanted to be a DJ. "It's called a chirp scratch. When I first heard it, I thought, 'Wow, how do you do that?' I was working at an ice cream shop, and I saved up and bought two turntables for probably \$1000. A decent mixer

was maybe \$100."

Figuring out how Jazzy Jeff did his chirp scratch meant hours of practice away from the public eye, same as any other musical instrument. "Even though from defending his title."

Pacman is still with the Sharpshooters, and I catch up with him working a Saturday night at club 923 in the Gaslamp. The place is near empty when I show

the turntable plays songs that are already made," says Pacman, "the way you use it to manipulate the sound, to create a rhythmic pattern, changes the songs. You can change the pace that's going for the crowd — the way you transition and put songs together. To me, that's kind of like an instrument."

Figuring out how he did that also meant respect. "Where we grew up, there weren't so many Laotian-Americans. But as far as hiphop was concerned, it didn't really matter. It just mattered what your skill set was." At first, he grants, the race thing might have made things a bit awkward, "but if you executed well, you were respected. D.M.C. from Run-D.M.C. would have these DJ battles, and the Filipino DI QBert won it three times. They actually retired him

up; extreme sports play on the big-screen TVs with the sound turned off. Pacman stands at a tiny booth in the front corner, wearing an Armory shirt styled after a Padres jersey and pushing music toward the couples in the booths on the opposite wall. Then, boom, in come a dozen girls in short black dresses and high black heels, over comes the bottle service of Svedka and mixers, and on go the familiar party tunes. "I'm not complaining," says Pacman. "When it's a birthday party" — and this is a birthday party — "you've got to recognize." He fires up the Trey Songz, and the girls whoop like crazy.

One girl spills her drink as she dances. An employee rushes over to towel it up, and the tipsy dancer freaks over top of him while he works. A girl who was stuck in the line to get into On Broadway shows up and starts drinking champagne straight from the bottle. More people show up, but the dominant force in the room is still that dozen pairs of bare legs twisting around each other on the dance floor.

Our DJ for tonight keeps it decently current — 50 Cent's "I Get Money," Busta Rhymes's "Arab Money," the Mary Jane Girls' "All Night Long," as well as the aforementioned "So Krispy." That keeps it fun for the birthday crowd; he keeps it interesting for himself by playing with his fades between songs. Sometimes it's seamless enough to be a little shocking — "We're in a different song now?" sometimes one beat drops into another;

sometimes he'll scratch in the beat. "It depends on my mood, how much flair I put in," he says after working some lowvolume scratches over the end of "Say Aah."

Pacman is 32, a year younger than Felt1. But they both learned their craft long before the advent of mp3s and Scratch Live software, which came into use around 2005. These days, a DJ could conceivably work without a set of headphones to help him match the beat before making it live. He could, if he was lazy enough, content himself with simply matching the beat patterns streaming across his lap-



top screen. (Actually, if he was lazy enough, he could make his mix at home and hit "play" in the club, but that's the kind of thing that will get you booted if you get caught.) Thanks to the computer, you can just pick a couple of tunes with similar beats per minute, line up your runs of bass and snare, and let 'em rip.

For someone who trained on vinyl, it can rankle. "I mean, it's sort of like you're playing Guitar Hero on Playstation," laments Pacman. "You're not a guitarist just because you can play Guitar Hero; you're kidding me. That's kind of how we see it. Because of technology, you have a million DJs in one city now. Microwave instant DJs, you know? But I'm not saying that it's bad or good. Just that they won't appreciate the level of skill as much as we did — or do."

Consider: in the mid-'90s, when Pacman was starting out, "One single was \$5.99. And sometimes, a DJ would want to repeat a verse or do tricks — make a different beat from the song - so you'd need two copies. A lot of the old-school DJs had doubles of everything. People still do that kind of thing," but now, all they have to do is cue up the same mp3 on both sides of their Scratch Live deck, and away they go. Plus, they're not hauling crates of vinyl everywhere. Kids today, with their parties at Belo.

Back in the day, it was undergrounds in the ballroom at the Red Lion Hotel in Mission Valley. Or the Scottish Rite Center. Or the Ramada Inn on Clairemont Mesa Boulevard. Somebody rents the hall, somebody prints the flyers. "You'd call a pager to find out where to get more info. You'd go there, and if you looked cool" — i.e., not a cop — "you'd go to the party. A thousand kids would come, 16 and up. There would be competitions — breakdancing battles, DJ battles, graffiti battles."

Pacman and friends began by attending undergrounds hosted by locals like Kutfather and Z90's Big Daddy, but it wasn't long before they were hosting their own, printing flyers at Kinko's and passing the word. "We were all just teenagers. It's crazy to think about it now." It started with house parties. After that, "You started doing quinceañeras or sweet 16s. If I knew someone's birthday was coming up, I'd ask them if I could DJ their party. I'd charge 20 or 40 bucks — it was worth it to have people hear me. And you're making the flyers, and it

says who's playing," and people come because, hey, the guy's name is on a flyer, and then they like the music, and here comes the reputation. "I remember my first which is now Belo. We used to pack the house. That was our time. I used to have three gigs a week, every month — that was a good chunk of change. But you know,

paying gig, some holein-the-wall where they charged \$5 to get in. They even had a booty contest for a pager. These girls were, like, 16, and I was 17, and just seeing that, I was, like, 'Oh my God.' That was how it all started." And after a while, you hooked up with some DJs you knew and respected and formed a crew, just to help market the brand. So that today, when people hear Sharpshooters, they know they're getting "hip-hop DJs who have been doing this for well over 15 years."

For better or for worse. "When I was 21, I was doing E Street Alley,

times change. You get new owners in clubs, promoters fighting with each other."

Those golden years of 21 to 26, "That's the position that the guys in a crew like Minds Alike are in now. When people go clubbing, they're in the DJ's age bracket. The promoter wants a DJ who can bring people in. When I was younger, every time I came out, I would know at least 50 people in the place. Now, they're at home with their kids. It was fun, but now it's different."

And on top of that, "Because of the technology, you have a million DJs. Some of them doing

nobody is, and building a reputation becomes more and more of a marketing game. "The way I learned it," recalls Pacman, "Kool Herc was credited with inventing hip-hop. He would take the break from a record and just repeat it, so that it made the beat. But that beat can be made on a computer now, and repeated on a computer. There's a slight delay as compared to analog," which can make scratching tricky, but digital still wins. It's just too easy. And the DJ "just fades into the background."

Well, almost, Pacman concedes that marketing heat "is based on a lot of things. It comes down to originality and technique and execution. And stage presence. You've got to be into it." And Pacman is still into it. "I'm doing smaller places, dive bars. Sometimes I'll get hired for the more mainstream stuff. and I'll do it. But I like the smaller venues. It's more personal. You can play the stuff you don't hear on the radio."

not much in the way

crowd of (mostly Asian) regulars. The bartenders are pretty and low-cut, but the crowd is mostly regular folks — nothing too glamorous or clubby in the outfit department. Still, the DIs have to cater to the crowd, and just like in the clubs, what they want is what's familiar. Danity Kane's "Showstopper" slips into Flo Rida's "Be on You" slips into Estelle's "Come Over," the bpm creeping from 73 to 82 as the floor starts to vibrate from the bass. (It's early, so they stick mostly to the clean versions that also get used in all-age venues.) A couple of light projectors start spinning colored dots around the room. One DJ reaches up to press a button on the canopy over the dance floor, and a couple of emitters spit out a cloud of dry ice that catches the rays of the light.

The DJs, Tu and Slim, hail from the Silly Entertainment crew. They've got their own thing going now, but they're still tight with Felt1 and Pacman, who they've known since the days of house parties and undergrounds. "Back then, the hotels were easy," recalls Tu. "We'd rent our own security, have our own people at the door, our own people taking care of drinks. Pretty much everything."

"And we'd have to rent a U-Haul to load all our gear," adds Slim. "It took two or three guys just to lift the amp rack."


Tu has been Tu since the day he was born, Slim is Slim because it sounded better than his other nickname, Bones. River Bar is their regular biweekly gig; they're friends with the managers, and they like to hang out there even when they're not working. It's a scattered sort of bar couches and wide-screen TVs in one corner, foosball and darts in another. a couple of pool tables that stay well lit and in use even as dancers fill up the square of wood floor in the center of the room. Slim and Tu have set up their gear on a table in front of the back wall: Technics turntables in Odyssev cases, heavy cables running to an 800-watt subwoofer and a couple of 400-



watt Yamaha speakers on seven-foot tripods, topped off by the ubiquitous Mac laptop. A promotional girl sashays over with shots of flavored vodka; usually, the two stick to Heineken in the bottle.

The whole scene is a lot more low-key than, say, eight or ten years ago, when Slim was getting flown to Vietnam or Denver to headline rave parties. But the two don't mind much; if things have changed since the old days, so have they.

Tu was in eighth grade when he started playing around with his

older brother's turntables. "My brother, DJ Kam, grew up with Slim — they were DJing back in high school. He heard me, and he thought I was pretty good. So he started taking me to gigs back when I was 16."

Now, Tu is 30, and as he mentioned, he has a day job. He finds that popular music doesn't grip him the way it once did, and not because he got older. "Back when hip-hop started, the lyrics were about trouble







at finding it. "When you play electronic music, the records are imported, so it cost twice as much. Every week, we would go to the record store and spend \$100plus, stocking up on vinyls — Tower Records, the Wherehouse, Sam Goody. But electronica wasn't like mainstream hip-hop, where everybody knows the song. If you had a rare track, it was to die for. I would call a guy in the U.K. at a couple of dollars a minute and ask, 'You got any new stuff?' He would play it over the phone, and if I liked it, he'd send it to me. I bought three or four records a week, and it cost a lot of money. And then two weeks later, the record stores would have it."

But it was worth it for those two weeks, Slim was the man, because he had what no one else had. "I had a friend, his older brother offered a guy \$100 for one record called 'China Girl' by Fun-Tomas, and he wouldn't sell it. He was the only one who had it, and every time he played it, the crowd went crazy. I finally found it last year on the internet."

Ah, the internet more digital democracy. Back in 2000, Kam and Slim marketed themselves by selling CDs of their mixes. Fans bootlegged their performances, and "the bootleg stuff sold at the momand-pop record stores, and that made us even better known." Now, of course, making a mix is just a matter of fiddling with your iTunes playlist or doing some scratchwork and uploading the whole thing to YouTube. Nobody pays for mixes anymore. And if Slim can find "China Girl" on the internet, so can

somebody else. No more exclusivity.

Still, it's all good. Slim and Tu have friends here at the River Bar; friends who stop by the turntables, shake hands, and toast, and everybody's having a good time, especially once the girls get out on the floor. The two DJs work off a common playlist,

held on a flash drive plugged into the Mac. Tu's scratching looks a little more aggressive and less silky than Slim's, but the difference in sound is hard for the untrained ear to detect — they're both fast. feral night beast stalking the dreams of haunted children. Biblical lepers like me, no less unclean for being blameless. He gave them to me, those eyes. The same color. In the picture, even the shapes are identical. I'd been told, always, that I had his eyes.

I look at him in his suit. By that time, on the way to middle class. The eviction notices, the charity school, the free-lunch programs things of the past. Soon we would move to the suburbs.

Next to him sits my mother, next to her, me. She holds herself awkwardly away from me and against him. As if she couldn't stand even to let our arms brush. Four of my sisters behind us, standing. Pressed close, everyone touching. Everyone but me.

I look at her, my mother. The lines in her face are those not of a hard life, but of a hard woman. I think of newspaper photos of baby-rapers, killers, psychopaths. Faces that make one shudder and think, Yes, this person is *capable of that.* The same look, in a face I'd trained myself to think of as that of a victim. As a woman who "did the best she could." That sometimes true, toooften-accepted excuse for any amount of horror.

What is it about mothers? So many of us, branded as property at birth, continue into adulthood to make excuses for our mothers. To offer them the protection they withheld when we not only needed but were entitled to it. So I wonder, what of me? Who protected and nurtured her own daughter so lovingly. What if I'd continued using drugs as my mother did? What if I'd had more kids? What if I'd sublimated a fine intellect to be a "better wife"? What if?

I look at my sisters. Realize with surprise that Elizabeth, one of several family drunks, was also the family beauty. She's radiant, alight with Black Irish fire.

There is Debbie, at 15. She has our mother's eyes and dark, glossy hair. Her face is smug, the world hers. The only one left in the house when I was five, I came to her, sobbing the shameful thing Daddy and I had done... Your mother won't anymore — you and *I love each other this way* our secret — only you — my special girl. I remember her response. "At least be glad

he spends some time with vou. He never even talks to me anymore." She'd been 14. To me, old and wise and utterly cool. I accepted her words into me like parasites. The special love my daddy shared with me, lucky girl. Be grateful. More than you deserve.

more evictions than I can count. I played in the cemetery as a child. We called it the park. Hide-n-seek among the headstones, sprawling in sunlight on the plaques of the ash plots.

Dirt poor, Debbie had horseback lessons. School dances. New dresses. Sister, did he have you too? You who rebuffed me, could you possibly have been jealous? Grown too old for him, seeing that lost child I was as a usurper?

And why you, ugly little slut-girl, five-year-old temptress of a churchgoing man? My other sisters: Siobhan, looking like Claudia Schiffer, buttercup blonde, porcelain skin, ridiculous curves. Siobhan, who never felt pretty. Erin, reeking style, elegant dress she made herself, perfect hair, luminous skin, and huge gray eyes. Now bitter, having lived her life the right way always, without reward. So much hope and promise, battles to be fought, worlds to be conquered. All ashes now. So much defeat, so much despair.

Finally I look at that ugly child. In the left of the frame, she stands alone. Anger and distaste on her mother's face, on her father's power and triumph. The eyes, graygreen slits in a swollen face. The hideous haircut. My sisters' hair spills over their shoulders like melted butter, like milk chocolate, like liquid flame. Though I smile, revealing buck teeth and a dimple, the face is blank.

When she sleeps, I stare at the remnants of the portrait and begin to weep. And to wonder, still. Why you? The undeserved guilt of a violated child is black magic, a thing of power. Forever seeking explanations for the inexplicable. Order from chaos, logic from horror.

I'd been taking heavy meds for the central nervous system disease that's one of my problems, and making progress. In the morning, the progress is gone. I'm worse. Facing an unpleasant course of chemotherapy, lengthy hospitalization if outpatient treatment doesn't work. Bastard. Reaching out from beyond the grave to have me yet again. The cervical cancer and gynecological problems that the doctor traces, with a sniff,

to "early intercourse," and now the debilitation, lack of remission. It's on him: Daddy. Rapist. Bottomfeeder. Maggot.

Although I've lost the vision in my right eye, I stare at the bathroom mir-

He gave me his eyes, and I gave them to my daughter. They're neither evil nor dead in her beloved face. As I stare at

ror. What, what, what! My mouth opens wide, and I shriek like a maniac, "I'M NOT ONE OF PAVLOV'S DOGS! FUCK YOU! FUCK YOU!" I mean to have my health back, I tell him, through my reflection, our eyes mingling in the glass. And more than that. I mean to have my joy. My birthright.

Cat has repeated to me something she was told. "We're not children anymore, and we're no longer forced to take the things our parents give us. If they give you something that hurts you, shove it back in their faces."

I don't have to accept the things they give me. I can get rid of the things they left me. Inheritances and legacies are two different things. My inheritances myself, I see, finally, they aren't in mine either. They are big and green and bright and full of life. He gave me his eyes, but not his soul. My daughter and I share his eyes, but our souls are our own. And they burn bright as votive candles in a dark church.

Long ago, a biological sister turned her back on me. Today, an *hermana* creates rituals and Christmas feasts, holds me when I cry, even when I fight to get away, and would literally lay down her life for me and my daughter. I have a family. And no vow ever made is more solemn than this: I will celebrate with them.

ment become part of the fabric - woven in for a long time? "In the downturn, companies cut back on costs, streamlined their workforces, and will continue doing this for a while," says Alan Gin of the University of San Diego. "The unemployment rate will be above 8 percent for the next couple of years." He thinks the county will add only 3000 to 5000 jobs this year but might tack on 10,000 next year. (However, that is a small part of 1.23 million total civilian jobs.)

Cox sees an addition of 6000 to 12,000 jobs this year and a small improvement next year, crawling up a bit each year. "The unemployment rate will be relatively high for five years, to around 2015," says Cox. "We will still be above 6 percent in five years, dropping only by about a half a percent per year."

Murtaza Baxamusa of the Center on Policy Initiatives says that San Diego's shortage of middle-class jobs "is a very pertinent problem." He feels that unemployment in San Diego "will hover around 10 percent for a while." But he doesn't think high unemployment will become the new reality: "There is more awareness of the macroeconomic impact [of high unemployment] on Main Street. This will not be accepted for too long."

Nationally, "Unemployment will be above 8 percent for several years," says economist James Hamilton of the University of California San Diego. Like Baxamusa, he believes a weaker dollar could help employment. On August 6, the U.S. Labor Department revealed that July job numbers were weak, and the unemployment rate remained at 9.5 percent. Some economists think the Federal Reserve will try to push long-term interest rates even lower, and the government might try even more fiscal stimulus. Hamilton, however, doesn't think that such initiatives will dramatically improve the job picture. And they will worsen the nation's financial stability: "We don't have unlimited ability to borrow," he warns.■

most worrisome. The "major uncertainties" are caused by offshore faults within 6 miles of the plant: the South Coast Offshore Fault Zone and the "faulting that connects" San Diego's Rose Canyon Fault Zone and the Newport-Inglewood Fault Zone, which extends north to L.A.

The plant "could experience larger ground motions from earthquakes than had been anticipated at the time the plant was designed," warns the consultant report.

In the event of a quake, San Onofre officials have assured the public that facilities can be safely shut down and all radioactive materials contained. Assuming they're right, the question still remains how we'd all be affected if San Onofre or Diablo Canyon were to cease generating power.

One pertinent example mentioned in the report is a magnitude 6.8 earthquake that hit Japan in 2007; the epicenter was about ten miles from the world's largest nuclear plant, the Kashiwazaki-Kariwa Nuclear Power Plant. In 90 seconds, 8000 megawatts of power generated by seven reactors was wiped off Japan's power grid. That's enough energy to power nearly 10 million households.

Three years later, only two of the reactors have passed safety evaluations and resumed operation. "They don't know if they'll

ever get the other ones back up," Becker told me. The plant's operator had to buy electricity from other sources. Total losses due to the shutdowns have surpassed \$12 billion.

One lesson learned from the Japanese experience: difficulty obtaining replacement parts and time spent completing repairs are not the only impediments to restarting plant operations; political and regulatory concerns can keep a nuclear plant inoperable as well.

San Onofre generates about 2254 megawatts of power at its two reactors, powering 2.75 million households. Diablo Canyon serves roughly 2.7 million customers through its 2200-megawatt generation capacity. While it's unlikely a single seismic event would disable both plants simultaneously, losing just one could trigger catastrophic power shortages across the state. The potential looms for rolling blackouts and massive utility rate spikes, as Californians would be forced to import power from other locales.

In early March, Becker flew to Washington to meet with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's chairman Gregory Jaczko to make the case that the commission should stay the hearings for Diablo Canyon's license renewal until seismic studies can be completed. Becker says Jaczko seemed receptive to the concerns she presented. But on July 6, the commission denied the stay.

The commission plans to hold a public meeting in California next month to discuss the commission's role and actions taken regarding seismic issues. Congressmembers Bob Filner of San Diego and Lois Capps of Santa Barbara have called on the commission to cooperate with state agencies in the relicensing

process. "We specifically ask the NRC to collaborate with our state's regulatory agencies and create a joint panel to review — upon their completion — the seismic studies requested of the utility by our state regulators and legislature," their letter reads.

While the state's Energy Commission can't force PG&E to complete seismic studies before it renews Diablo Canyon's license, the state does have some leverage. To pay for license renewal, an estimated \$85 million, PG&E must gain the approval of the state Public Utilities Commission for recovery of funds. (Whom are they recovering the funds from? California ratepayers.) The state agency has not yet approved PG&E's request.

Becker says that San Onofre's operator, SoCal Edison, has been following PG&E's progress. Although SoCal Edison's July 26 filing with the Public Utilities Commission mentions funding for license renewal, the filing is primarily concerned with funding for seismic studies. The filing states that seismic projects at San Onofre will commence in 2012.

to a spike in crimes, which ranged from trespassing to commercial, residential, and vehicle burglaries.

Law enforcement and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service began patrolling sites that included the wooded areas behind Staples, the YMCA, and the historic steel bridge on **Campo Road. The homeless** "disturbed area wildlife and have been destructive to the watershed," said Carrillo. Inmate work crews removed large amounts of trash and brush from the areas, and law enforcement posted trespass notices.

Carrillo said the transient population includes mostly 35- to 65-year-old males and females who grew up in the Spring Valley, Jamul, and Rancho San Diego areas. He said they have likely been living the transient life for years and were not there due to a loss of job or their home.

**Transients were warned** of the sweep that took place on July 31. On that morning, none of the homeless were to be found. "I would like to think they have located housing, but most of the time people locate another area out of view." said Carrillo. "There has been a definite decline of crime in the areas closest to where the transients were living."

velop the empty car lot by entering into a lease agreement with Poway Toyota. The auto dealership will move from its current lot across the street to the former Chrysler lot and combine it with two other lots that it plans to purchase for what will be a 45,000-square-foot mega-dealership.

"The new Toyota site will serve as a catalyst to eliminate blighting conditions, spur economic activity, and attract investment into the project area," reads a study attached to the staff report. "These defunct dealerships have become an eyesore to the community and are primary contributors to economic and physical blight."

The blight on Poway Road has worsened since the economy shifted to reverse in 2007. Four auto dealerships in four years have shuttered the doors, including Poway Chrysler Jeep, Poway Chrysler Dodge, JR Auto Sales, and General Motors Chevrolet.

Another facet of the city's redevelopment plan focuses on the lot that will be left vacant after Toyota moves to its new location. According to the August 17 agenda, Lowe's Home Improvement is in the process of purchasing Toyota's old car lot as well as the "underutilized" Poway Chevrolet lot as the site for a new store.

### The Butcher's Block

**Budget Cuts, Outlook Grim** for City's Finances

National City — "Around 2005 we found out that our checkbook wasn't looking like we needed it to. It's fair to say that this budget year is particularly treacherous," said Chris Zapata, city manager for National City, at the opening of the August 10 special budget meeting.

The purpose of the meeting was to try and fill the budget gap by cutting the library department, recreation department, and the city's senior centers.

The gaping hole that is the city's structural deficit continues to grow. During fiscal year 2009–2010, National City had to dip into the reserves and find other funding to balance a \$3.3 million shortfall. The shortfall is expected for the next three years. According to Zapata, city revenues are back to 2004 levels, despite the 1 percent city sales-tax increase passed in 2006.

The city's library department was first on the butcher's block. Staff pre-

sented the mayor and city councilmembers with five options, ranging from doing nothing and keeping the library open seven days a



week to closing the library doors three days a week.

In addition to reducing hours at the library, the council also deliberated on proposals to slash the neighborhood council program, reduce hours at recreation centers and the Kimball Senior Center, and to put a tarp on the community pool for the winter.

"Nobody here predicted this except maybe the guy standing on the corner with a clipboard saying that the world was going to end," said Mayor Ron Morrison during council deliberation.

By the end of the night, the city council managed to trim \$270,000 of fat from the budget, \$130,000 short of their goal. They did so by reducing library hours by 12 hours a week, which saved the city approximately \$140,000 a year, eliminating one full-time position on the neighborhood council program, closing recreation centers one hour earlier each day, shuttering the Kimball Senior Center on Fridays, and shutting down the pool on Sundays.



## THE LAND INVADERS

### They went up to the empty hills and claimed the land for themselves.

Don Manuel lives where the border fence ends. in the mountains east of Tijuana. He's heard about the murder of the police chief, about the execution of the lawyer who represented the man allegedly behind Tijuana's drug cartel. But Don Manuel is 86 years old and 2000 feet above the city. And here, where horses are for transport and pigs are for eating and cactus fields are for harvesting and candles light the night,
he has a more
i m m e d i a t e
problem: people
have bulldozed his
neighbor's houses.
Now they're selling
lots on a triangle of
the land that he and
Don Gabino Moreno
Santana, the president
of their land association,
say is theirs.

Tonight a district attorney for the state of Baja California has come to hear their story. Everyone gathers around a fire on the dirt floor of the community hall, which took them a decade to build. They talk while Señora Alma barbecues carne asada and heats tortillas on a metal rack. This meal is a thank you to the DA for his efforts. The smoke curls up and out through the space in the brick wall where a window will be. There's still no electric light or windows or floor, so Don Manuel draws a map

in the dust with a stick. "The bulldozers from the ejido [governmentgranted group-owned lands] down the hill just came one day and destroyed our homes," says Isabel Félix. "No warning. They destroyed the furniture, everything. They even smashed the water tank. It was a good thing the people were at work, otherwise they wouldn't even have their clothes and tools." Licenciado "Pérez" (who

asked that his real name not be used) eats his carne asada and tortilla and beans, sips from a bottle of Tecate beer, and listens. A Baja California state district attorney, he has made the hour-long journey, half of it over rocky, unpaved steep gully roads, to find out about this group's claims.

"Alma wrote a complaint against the people," says Isabel. "The [municipal] police came.

But they just looked and left. Don Gabino went to private lawyers, gave them money. Nothing happened! Then he asked people where he could go to get justice. And they told him about the licenciado and the Unidad Orgánica Contra Despojos [the (state) unit against real estate land theft]. He didn't expect much. He is so happy that the *licenciado* actually came up to us, to see. Licenciado Pérez, he is like a god!"

She laughs, but she means it.

Pérez's day started around 9:00 this morning, like most of his mornings at the downtown Tijuana office that he shares with four other attorneys of the Ministerio Público, the state police and district attorney headquarters, near the bullring.

It's difficult to find the cinderblock house, tucked behind the main building. This is where most Tijuana murders and robberies are investigated. Blue vans pull up and disgorge handcuffed felons. Plainclothes state cops stand around in the sun with square black pistols stuffed into their jeans. Some snack on papaya and cottage cheese and honey from Pedro's fruit stand. Appellants approach public writers — escritorios públicos — to help them fill out forms. Smooth-suited defense attorneys in jackets and shades bustle up and down the sidewalk, looking out for their clients.

Among the day's clump of people gathered outside the garden of the Unidad Orgánica Contra Despojos, Don Gabino and a worried-looking woman (who identified herself only as Margarita) wait for Pérez with armloads of papers and plans. Like everybody else, they're here to complain of land invasion. In a city

where only 25 percent of the population is satisfactorily housed and 80,000 new settlers arrive each month, this is one of the busiest sections of state law enforcement.

Pérez sits in the back office hearing the *denuncias*, accusations, by traditionally dressed people from the edge of town.

"This is my work. I sit here and listen to landowners come in and denounce squatters," says Pérez. "If our research backs them up, we enforce. We give the squatters on their land 72 hours to move." It's rarely as simple as that.

"This is nothing like it was," says Pérez, a quick, short man who enjoys people. He says that back in the '80s there were literally tens of thousands of squatters. It was out of hand: People with no money coming north for work, some of the 26 million Mexicans who live in extreme poverty and 40 million who are considered poor (according to Mexican-government figures quoted by Reuters). They may have had jobs in the *maquiladoras* but nowhere to live.

"The problem with land in Mexico, mostly on the borders, is the great number of immigrants from inside Mexico," says Pérez. "Too many people; not enough housing for rent and so few houses for sale. And the ones that are average \$2000 — too expensive for these immigrants from little towns with no money.

"So these people started to organize in the early '70s. They went up to the empty hills and claimed the land for themselves, saying that the nation should give [land] to its people, because the constitution guarantees that right to Mexicans — education, good health, and a place to live with dignity.

"Then the state [counteracted by] approving new laws, including this *despojo* 

felony law to try to stop the illegal invasion of land. But for the government it was very difficult to try to grab these thousands of people and put them all in jail. Complete families. It became a conflict between the law and a social problem the government had to deal with."

As he talks, Pérez signs court orders and correspondence with a swirling signature. He says the state eventually created a less stringent law. Squatters would still be tossed off the land, but state and federal agencies would offer them government land to buy at rock-bottom prices — say, \$700 to \$1000 — with low or no-interest drip payment.

"If they leave within 72 hours, we don't prosecute," he says. "And the government is working on their case to provide land for them. A big part of Tijuana is growing because of these kinds of settlements." Pérez points to a distinguishedlooking older man in a big hat waiting outside. "That gentleman has been in jail because he took land and profiteered from the migrants. Líderes sociales like him manipulated immigrants into invading land and then, in effect, making them pay protection money."

But times are changing. "Land invasions are down 80 percent since the 1980s, but there will be new waves. The government has got to find new ways to provide land to the people."

\* \* \*

The unusual thing about Pérez's office is that, unlike most bureaucracies, he and his colleagues don't just sit and read files. "Paper is cruel," Pérez says, "and sometimes deceptive. I like to look into people's faces, see the land, find out what's going on." Half an hour

later that's exactly what he's doing. He swings off the highway to Rosarito and up a pitted road to a housing development. Building appears to have stopped halfway through construction. Margarita is here, sitting up front with Pérez. She points to certain houses. "Eighty houses," she says. "That's what the teachers' union was supposed to get. But they've taken over 100, including mine. They're living in them!"


Pérez pores over plans until he finds one house that's occupied. He stops, marks the place on the plan, tucks his gun into the back of his trousers, and goes to speak to two people working in the small garden.

"I'm afraid you are going to have to leave," he says. "Seventy-two hours." "But I'm a federal-education employee," says the man.

"And I'm a state-education employee," says the woman, Dulce. "And it was the state developer of this project who told us, 'Move in!'

"The best thing," says Pérez, aware of the lives he is turning upside-down, "is not to wait the 72 hours. Come see our office with your papers."

An hour later we are bumping through the northeasternmost colonia of Tijuana, Las Torres. This is Rinconada Dos. The road is like a potholed rollercoaster ride. Rinconada Dos is one of Tijuana's newest settlements. Four years ago it was empty land. Snaking down into the gully, we ease back up the other side while a blue-and-white bus labeled El Dorado comes lurching by. Plywood shacks dot the hillsides, a few houses too. But it's rough and mostly dirt-scrabble. "You work out how long it would take a patrol car to come here to [a crime

Gustavo Hernández, who's been sitting in the back, directs Pérez up a steep, empty hill to a flat space on its shoulder. Don Gabino and Héctor Villalvazo come to meet Pérez. then escort him to the land they believe has been stolen from their property, the Granjas Familiares [Family Farms], "División del

"División del Norte was Pancho Villa's famous division, right?" Pérez asks Villalvazo. "Right," answers Villalvazo.

What we see is not exactly a war zone, but concrete slabs where small houses once stood dot the slope. Fences have gone up, lots marked out, a few houses constructed. The siege mood is deepened by the sight of the rusty international border fence dividing the hill beyond. Don Gabino points to a small house painted with signs in the distance. "Oficina Ejido Matamoros," says the main sign. "Nueva Dirección."

Pérez says he'll have to

research this issue before acting. Gabino asks if we'll come to the "community

The hall stands unfinished beside a school that went up with the help of San Diego's Rotary Club. Inside the hall, coals glow and smoke rises. Gradually you can make out the men and women gathered here to thank Pérez for taking an interest; since the problem started two years ago, this is officialdom's first recognition. They hand out beers and start cooking the carne

Don Manuel wants to talk about his cactus patch, which gives him "50 to 60 cases of nopales every week" to sell. But Pérez wants to talk business.

"Don Manuel, hear me: Have you been living here for 14 or 15 years? You know how things are?"

"Who had the land fenced? Who are the owners of the land they say has been invaded? Is it these [people] here?"

others will bring you [down to Tijuana] so you can make a statement. Let's go."

"He'll make one of the strongest witnesses," Pérez says half an hour later, as we bump back down toward the valley of lights that is Tijuana. "Even if the people from the other ejido have their own maps, it won't help. Because they took the law into their own hands. They destroyed other people's shelter. They should have come to us." Nearer town, as we wait for a snarl of buses and pickups to untangle, Pérez

exhales a satisfied sigh.

"This is what I love doing," he says. "My official lunchtime is 3:00 to 6:00. But I could tell in my office that these people had real problems. And what more interesting lunch could you have?" It is 7:00 p.m. by the time we arrive back at state-police headquarters. A light shines in the office; Pérez's secretary is there alone. Out in the garden Pérez sees a shadow. A woman stands up and comes into the light. It's Dulce from the government housing project. She's been waiting since 6:00. She begs the licenciado to see her now and tell her if her papers are really not legal. ■

In fact, while other colleges are cutting classes and staff, Southwestern College is offering new programs, not cutting staff, and increasing the funds allotted to cover employee health care. Getting the word out seems like a good idea.

### The Falls Behind The **Ugly Store**

So what do San Diego developers and planners have against waterfalls ("City Lights," "College Housing Will Ruin the Gorge," July 29)? There are so few here for them to destroy. In addition to the Adobe Falls mentioned in the "City Lights" article, we have a similar situation with El Saito Falls along Buena Vista Creek in Oceanside. Existing development to the south created a monumental visual blight. To view this stunning waterfall you must drive to the rear of a Kohl's department store, park next to the massive monument sign (had to be visible from the 78 freeway, you know), and look down into the arroyo below.

Now imagine if there was a fashionable restaurant with outside dining at this spot or some other relaxing outdoortype use such as a bookstore, coffeehouse, etc., with a promenade along the edge for visitors to look at the falls. Something similar to what Vista did near the water park off Vista Village Drive (yes, Vista!), but better as this has a real waterfall. Alas, no. While the Oceanside Planning Commission recently approved safeguards to protect the falls, it's ultimately up to the city council when this area, presently known as Quarry Creek, finally comes up for final development approval. Whatever is allowed should provide public use (as mentioned above) and minimal noise so visitors can hear the falls, and so wildlife attracted to the falls won't be disturbed.

In regard to Adobe Falls, I would have thought that an institution of higher education such as San Diego State would have come up with a stunning plan to preserve such an amenity. Seems to me that of the three creek projects mentioned, the only one that shows any class at all came out of the City of Vista. Maybe they should protect these two waterfalls.

### Licorice, Cohosh, **Blessed Thistle**

I read with interest your "Best Buys" article (July 29) as it was about using herbs to help relieve PMS. I couldn't help but notice all the advice your writer wrote about was given by people who worked at health food stores. She didn't mention if they were herbalists or not. It is not a good idea to take advice from someone who iust works at a health food store when it comes to using plants as medicine.

For example, several of the medicines mentioned included black cohosh, and one of the medicines containing this herb required long-term use.

Black cohosh shouldn't be used for longer than three months, nor should one take more than five grams as it can cause toxic symptoms. Licorice, another in one of the medicines recommended, is probably included only for taste, but large doses over a four-week time period can promote hypertonia.

And blessed thistle is an appetite stimulant so I'm not sure why that would be recommended to regulate the digestive system!

Plant medicine has a place in our medicine cabinets, but just because it is "all natural" doesn't mean there aren't cautions associated with ingesting them. Most medicinal herbs are toxic in high doses or when taken over long periods of time. Some plant medicines can have ill effects when taken with Western medicines.

If you are interested in using herbal remedies, I highly recommend you consult with a trained

herbal practitioner and not an employee of a health food

Invader's works can be seen throughout the city; the pixeled Space Invaders are in 21 different locations, one on a building on the corner near the Museum of Contemporary Art.



Located along the Mediterranean in Italy, Cinque Terre is a collection of five towns nestled along the coast overlooking the Ligurian Sea. A train runs often, so you can travel from one town to the next easily. Each town has wonderful hiking paths that wind along the coast through vineyards and trees. Trails are clearly marked and come with amazing views of the coast.

Grapes are grown just about everywhere, and many are used to make wine that can be purchased at one of the many shops. Not just wine is produced here—sample some *limoncello*— a liquor made with lemons. After a day of hiking,

enjoy a glass of wine or *limoncello* as you relax while watching fishermen come in with fresh seafood that's prepared at the many restaurants.

For inexpensive accommodations, Hostel Cinque Terre is located conveniently in Manarola, one of the five towns of Cinque Terre that overlooks the town. Rates start at 20 euros a night. For a little more privacy, there are also many small hotels and bed-and-breakfasts.

### Liquid Gold in Munich, Germany

Oktoberfest may be the annual climax of Germany's love of hops, hefs, and everything in between, but locals worship their golden beers year-round.

Begin your journey at Hofbräuhaus, the unofficial headquarters of Munich beer connoisseurs. Here you'll find beer tourists and locals lined side by side along stretches of wooden tables. While heavy in tourist traffic, this stop should not be missed.

Next, take a detour from your *tour de bier* to admire the Frauenkirche

cathedral. The domed towers are a fine example of onion-shaped (or *zwiebel-turm*) structures. Then venture over to Marienplatz to visit the new and old city halls.

After working up an appetite for more beer, quench your thirst for brew in the serene Hofgarten, located between the Residenz and the Englischer Garten. Under a canopy of trees in this royal garden you'll be able to pull up a chair, throw back some cold liters of *radler* (beer with lemonade), and maybe catch a game of *fussball*.

Regain your strength after a long day of Munich sightseeing and beertasting at — you guessed it — another internationally renowned beer house. At Spatenhaus an der Oper you'll have the chance to try more than hop- and wheat-infused libations. Order the

spanferkelbraten, slow-roasted pig with a crispy beer-glazed skin, along with a portion of knödel and sauerkraut. For dessert, consider bayerische creme, a rich Bavarian dessert. Enjoy the best of Bavarian cuisine with museum views from the outside patio or traditional decor inside the restaurant.



### **TWIN PEAKS**

Enjoy an all-around view from the top of Poway's Twin Peaks summit.

Distance from downtown San Diego: 26 miles Hiking length: 2 miles round-trip • Difficulty: Moderate



Atop Twin Peaks

win Peaks, a scruffy, boulderstudded promontory rising amid Poway's suburban streets, is less known for its own existence than for the major street named


after it: Twin Peaks Road. After a short but vigorous climb, it's fun to poke in and around the fractured outcrops of rock and stand on the breezy summit to admire the inclusive view of Poway and its environs. The two-mile round-trip to the top involves a short, very steep segment of hard-packed dirt road, plus another very steep

section of narrow trail strewn with jagged rocks, so make sure your shoes have good ankle support and traction. This could be quite an adventure for little ones, as long as they are properly supervised and possibly given an assist at a couple of spots. For summertime comfort, you'd best make this climb in the cool morning or early evening hours. And don't forget to take along drinking water.

To get to the starting point for the Twin Peaks hike, exit Interstate 15 at Ted Williams Parkway and drive east 2.5 miles to Twin Peaks Road. Turn right (east), proceed 0.4 mile, and turn left on Silverset Street. Drive north to the end of the street and arrive at Silverset Park, where you can leave your car either in a small lot or in the surrounding neighborhood.

From Silverset Park, you face a climb of 700 vertical feet. Start off. by following a fire road going northeast to the brow of a south-trending ridge. Just as this road starts to flatten and descend, veer left on a narrow path going left (north) up along the ridge. After 0.2 mile the path bends left and makes a brief descent through thick chaparral into the bottom of a ravine. Once you're in that ravine, turn sharply uphill and climb straight to the saddle between the two peaks. The peak to the left, about 60 feet higher than the one on the right, has the better view by far.

As seen from the summit, a car-



pet of tract-style homes recedes in the south, while mansions on generous lots fill the hills and valleys to the north and east. A small blue slice of Lake Poway lies some three miles to the northeast, while the more conspicuous rock-fill dam of Ramona Reservoir nuzzles into rocky hills beyond. Look for the distinctive "Tooth Rock" in the east, atop a ridge in the middle distance.



### **OUTDOORS**

Thunderstorms have visited the Imperial Valley and parts of eastern San Diego County over the past several weeks. The seasonal arrival of moisture from the east and south, more or less typical for late summer, contributes to the greening of certain kinds of vegetation. On the desert floor, for example, the spidery ocotillo can grow an instant crop of green leaves after a storm, only to drop them two to three weeks later if no further rain arrives. The distribution of green-leaved ocotillos tells not only where rain has recently fallen; it also indicates where the runoff has collected and remained for enough time to be absorbed by the ocotillo's

Grunion Runs are predicted to occur during the late evening hours (generally after 10pm and before 1am), following the nocturnal high tide, August 24 though August 26. The small, silvery grunion tend to spawn on wide, gently sloping beaches such as Silver Strand, Mission Beach, Pacific Beach, La Jolla Shores, and Del Mar. During the months of April and May, grunion are protected and may not be taken by fishers through any means. Open season for grunion started in June, and ends with the last runs of the season, which are likely these three nights. The fish can be collected in reasonable numbers using the hands only (fishing license needed for persons 16 years of age and older). For more information, visit dfg.

The Full Moon rises impressively from the east horizon at around 7:20pm, very close to the time of sunset, on Tuesday, August 24. Some not-so-well-known folk names for the August full moons include "corn moon," "barley moon," and "moon when cherries turn black."

**Venus,** the lanternlike planet shining in the west after sunset, reaches greatest elongation from the sun on Thursday, August 19. That means the planet is illuminated from the side by the sun, as seen from Earth's perspective. Turn a small telescope on Venus, and you will probably be able to discern its current phase or shape, which looks like a perfect capital letter D.

The mamey milkshake, with its sweet custard flavor, was the perfect thing for a hot Miami afternoon.

As Long as You're Upright


Don't forget to rejoice! —



San Diego Reader: How long do you spend writing your sermon?

Christopher Clark: Each sermon I'll spend an average in study and preparation of about 20 to 25 hours. I typically go through and look at the block of text I'm being led to preach on. All the while I'm praying and letting the text speak for itself. I will go through and

look at the original language in which it was written, whether Greek or Hebrew or Aramaic. I will parse the verbs and decline the nouns and diagram the sentences. Then I'll go back and revisit my outline and synthesize it into one statement: "What is the text telling me?" Then I make a declarative statement to use as my main take-away as the message....Then I'll look for a practical application and illustrate the points through a first-person story, a news item, or an amusing little anecdote.

**SDR**: Can you think of a time when you gave a sermon that completely flopped?

CC: One time I was preaching and the power went out — I mean everything went out — the lights went out, the electricity — I had no sound. Talk about a little intimidating! Everyone just stopped. So, I thought, where do I pick up from here? So I said, "All right, here's what I'm going to do. I guess I'm going to get down with you and walk up and down the aisles and keep my voice just loud enough and if you get to a point where you can't hear me, put your hand up." So, I just had to gather my thoughts and continue on at that point.

SDR: What is your main worry as member of the clergy?

CC: The biggest concern is that...among pastors in America, there are still too many of us that take the freedoms and liberties we have in this country for granted. We have removed ourselves from our neces-

sary role in serving as our country's moral compass. We have been overly concerned about being liked to the point where we have neglected our need to train our people to stand and be society's moral voice. Martin Luther King said it best when he said that the church is neither the master

nor the slave of the government; rather, the church is the conscience of the government. If the Church ceases to be that moral voice, it will become as irrelevant as a country club or any other organization. We risk that danger because too many pastors are scared to death of declaring and proclaiming

the full counsel of God and doing so in a loving way but at the same time with clarity. **SDR**: Where do you go when you die?

CC: When I die I am going to heaven because I put my trust in Jesus. I'm going to Him - along with those who also put their trust in Jesus. As the alternative, if they choose to turn away from Jesus, they will go to an eternal punishment. Call it hell, everlasting punishment, Hades, the second death, like a fire, whatever it is, there are a number of references to it in Scripture, but Jesus is the only way to have eternal life in heaven.


Why atheism today? — The "father" in God has been thoroughly refuted; ditto, "the judge," "the rewarder." Also his "free will": he does not hear — and if he heard he still would not know

how to help. Worst of all: He seems incapable of clear communication: is he unclear?

This is what I found to be causes for the decline of European theism, on the basis of a great many conversations, asking and listening. It seems to me that the religious instinct is

indeed in the process of growing powerfully but the theistic satisfaction it refuses with deep suspicion. — Section 53, Part III: "What Is Religious?" from Beyond Good and Evil.

Friedrich Nietzsche (1844-1900) is one of the most influential philosophers of modern times Some critics go so far as to say that he almost singlehandedly invented modernity through his profound efforts to break with the philosophical traditions that formed Europe. Beyond Good and Evil takes up where arguably his most famous work, Thus Spoke Zarathustra, left off, attempting to extricate philosophy from what he considered the erroneous assumptions of Christianity.



arol Williams — San Diego civic organist and artistic director of the Spreckels
Organ Society — hates the heat. She also hates it when the wind blows her hair in

her eyes and when June bugs fly past her nose. It's fortunate, then, that the Organ Pavilion at Balboa Park faces north

(which keeps the organ pipes, the console, and Williams out of the sun) and that assistant organ curator Dale Sorenson is always nearby.

During the Sunday, August 8, afternoon concert, Sorenson, in a blue shirt and khaki pants, stood next to the organ console while Williams played a little bit of everything — from French Baroque (Marchand) to Tin Pan Alley (Gershwin) on the 4500-pipe Spreckels organ.

"During the concert, I provide page-turning for her because of the wind," said Sorenson. "She has much of her music under the Plexiglas music rack. And today there were bugs flying around, and she doesn't like bugs. So I was out here for bug patrol."

More bothersome, however, was the issue with a wireless microphone that refused to work at showtime, just as Sorenson began his introduction.

"Somebody said the Navy had just changed frequencies, so who knows what's going on?" said Sorenson. "It worked before the concert. I tried it, and it worked. But when I go to intro-

duce Carol? Nothing."

So it was into a backup wired microphone that Sorenson finally introduced Carol

Williams and the magnificent Spreckels organ... with his arms hanging limp at his sides and his eyes glazed over, as if he were asleep. Well, he *has* made this introduction hundreds of times.

"I did almost miss a page-turn today," said Sorenson, later. "She nodded, and I wasn't paying attention. She nodded again, and I went, 'Oh, sorry!"

One audience member, a self-professed "regular" named Steve — wearing a straw hat and reading his newspaper in the shade of a small tree — said he has heard Sorenson's introductory remarks more than a few times. "I come every week," he said.

The Summer Organ Festival on Monday evenings (June 21 through August 30) provides a more formal concert experience. "Not stuffy-stuffy," said Sorenson. "I mean, it's still San Diego. You're dressed up if you wear socks." On Sundays the lively park atmosphere encourages

what Williams calls a more "transient" audience.

Transient, indeed. For the full hour of the concert, people wandered in and out of the seating area — on bikes or skateboards, pushing strollers or walking dogs, talking on cell phones or chitchatting over lunch on one of the back benches.

Sorenson suggests an attendance of 800 for the performance. The author would offer a more conservative estimate of 300, unless one counts the people passing by on the fringes who paused to look at their map while on

the way to the Air and Space Museum or the Philippine Cultural Arts Festival happening down the way on Presidents Way Lawn.

Several members of a group of Sundayschool teachers visiting from Sacramento snapped pictures of each other in front of the organ building's Greek Revival architec-

ture while Williams played an excerpt from Gustav Holst's outerspacey and aptly titled *Jupiter Theme*.

Michael and Gaynor, a couple visiting from Wales, had never heard of the Spreckels organ and were drawn to the concert by the sound of the music, which reminded them of "chapel music" from back home. They found the atmo-

sphere charming.

"It's a bit of a twist with the umbrellas in front there, isn't it?" said Gaynor, referring to the multicolored umbrellas that audience members can rent from the Spreckels Organ Society for \$2 each to shade themselves from the summer sun.

Longtime friends David and Martin also happened upon the concert but only stayed for ten or fifteen minutes.

"We'd stay longer," said Martin, "except we're broiling." The music, they agreed, was wonderful, and Williams's playing was "obviously very high level." More than that, they were impressed with the accessibility of the concert itself.

"The fact that it's available and it's free is most unique," said David, who's visiting from Russia, where he teaches English and where "even though they were the people's people, the people's things are not free."

San Diegans Jason and Cathy rode through on their bikes, stopping to listen just long enough to drink from their water bottles. While Jason was impressed by the fact that "the same chick" has been playing these concerts every Sunday afternoon since 1998, it wasn't enough to make him want to stay.

"I mean, it's cool," he said, "but I don't really dig that kind of organ. It's just not something I would sit around and watch forever. But I do dig the umbrellas."

Carol Williams is accustomed to all the coming and going. "You just play," she said. "You just do your job."

Dale Sorenson agrees: It goes with the territory. It's a Sunday afternoon in the park, after all.

But, he added, there is "a certain amount of decorum that takes place on a Sunday. We like to be dignified. The core people that really want to hear the organ tend to sit in the middle in the front.

If somebody's being nasty, there's peer pressure put on them — the look of death, that sort of thing." ■

## **Cosmopolitan Comfort Cuisine**

Carl Schroeder was the hot young chef hired by Bradley Ogden to oversee Arterra back when it was new. Schroeder made both his and the restaurant's name there. Then he opened his own place, Market, at the northeastern edge of Del Mar — a long drive from the city, with steep prices as befits the upscale neighborhood (a quick drive from the fabled Chino Farms in Rancho Santa Fe). With Bankers Hill, he brings his talent downtown to a restaurant with a neighborhood feel and more neighborly prices, with entrées all under \$20.

The site of the former Modus has been handsomely transformed so that it looks twice the size and feels three times as airy. Tall, open front doors with wood frames and glass panes let in the oxygen. The lighting seems brighter. Tables are packed to the maximum possible, and given the lack of carpeting, the noise level is high but not quite unbearable. On a Thursday night, every chair was occupied by all manner of people, ranging from elderly quartets and a few older men entertaining eye-candy "nieces" (whose costumes were fancier but briefer than other patrons'), down to the 20ish T-shirted crowd hanging out on the roofed-over, glass-enclosed patio that serves as an extension to the bar. Schroeder's partner, blonde and willowy Terryl Gavre (owner of popular breakfast place Café 222 and food columnist for San Diego Metro), has moved from hostessing and running the front of the house at Market Restaurant to doing the same at Bankers Hill.

The seasonal menus reveal the same farm-to-table ethos as Market, in simpler preparations but with fewer costly ingredients. As you'd expect from this new formula, the brightest flavors and most exciting combinations are found among the salads and vegetable-centered appetizers. Our best dish consisted of large, lush slices of red heirloom tomatoes surrounding a wondrous thick splat of genuine, rare Burrata cheese (Mozzarella so young, it hasn't fully solidified and still bursts with cream) sprinkled with basil pesto and accompa-

nied by garlic-infused flatbread slices with crisp exteriors, soft interiors. It's well-nigh perfect, a catalog of intense pleasures.

I also loved the eccentric salad of ripe peaches

with shreds of fine prosciutto, candied almond slivers, and puffs of goat cheese, all over arugula. Prosciutto and melon is a cliché. But peaches? That's fresh, a way

to savor this seasonal fruit at its purest without gumming it up in a sugary dessert.

Small oysters fried in a cornmeal batter were topped with dollops of Meyer lemon aioli and plated with a crunchy salad of julienned celery root and tart apples. The oysters didn't quite knock me out — they were tender enough, but not very briny. (I'd guess they're farm-raised Carlsbad oysters; the aquacultured mussels are terrific while the oysters are somewhat bland.)

Deviled eggs were mildly disappointing. They were spicy but otherwise nothing new, although they came with a lovable arugula-bacon salad and lemon shoestring potatoes. Also, they were

were five of us. In many restaurants (upscale or even mid-scale), especially those with truly professional service, our plate might have held an extra egg, given our lengthy, spendy

have held an extra egg, given our lengthy, spendy food order. An egg costs about a dime, wholesale... maybe 20 cents for organic. A displeased table of customers can cost far more than that in lost future dinners.

Service fell apart grievously at our final appetizer. The organization here is that a waitperson takes your order, then runners deliver it from the kitchen: you rarely see your original server again. We received four out of five appetizers,



then had to wait to catch a glimpse of our server before we could hail her. (She hinted, displeased, that a runner had probably left our final dish at the kitchen.) A minute or two later, we finally received our chilled Dungeness crab, shredded and heaped over batter-fried green tomatoes and served with corn-arugula salad. The green tomatoes were the best part — succulent, crisped slices, more sweet than acidic. (They were probably not hard, sour underripe tomatoes but an heirloom variety, green but savory when ripe.) The Dungeness was bland, minus the intense sweetness I remember from eating it in its native San Francisco. But that's a "San Francisco treat" that locals eat mainly in season, late fall through early spring, usually steamed whole with melted

butter at home or cracked and stir-fried with garlic or black beans at local Asian restaurants. In summer, it's left to the tourists at Fisherman's Wharf.

The wine list starts out moderate but escalates rapidly, though not ridiculously (e.g., \$105 for a 2006 Joseph Phelps Cabernet and \$155 for Nickel & Nickel "Branding Iron"). I'd recently been reading about Argentina's Torrontés white (\$29) in a food magazine and promised myself to try it again ASAP and pay more attention this time. As the magazine promised, it does have a subtly peachy flavor. But once we started drinking it with food, it was easy to lose track of such subtleties. For the entrées, an M. Chapoutier blend of Syrah, Grenache, and Carignan grapes from Roussillon (in the sunny far South of France) hit the spot with a velvety texture and a touch of spiciness (\$39). True to its grapes, it tasted like a wandering Rhône that picked up a little suntan on its southern vacation.

The sexes split over favorite entrées. My friend Lynne and I both fell for the duck confit, a leg of tender meat embellished with balsamic-roasted peach sections, plus a corn-shallot salad. The three dudes in the evening's posse fell harder for the spice-rubbed USDA Prime flat-iron steak, ordered "very rare" and delivered rare (enough), served sliced over twice-baked potato, garnished with roasted mushrooms and Worcestershire butter. The steak is flavorful but slightly tough, cut from a small, sheltered, well-marbled section of the hard-working front shoulder (chuck). Even Prime-grade and rare, it takes some chewing. But it's a good steak for the price.

It's the rest of this menu listing that's a little misleading. That twice-baked potato is no Idaho baker, with all the Idaho's rich spud flavor — it's a couple of bland red-skinned new potatoes (which American homecooks usually serve boiled, sautéed in hash, or sometimes roasted in olive oil and herbs or tucked under a roast beef to

bake in the drippings). These seemed boiled, not baked, except to reheat (no crisp crusts on them), and even tarted up with sour cream and a touch of melted cheese, they are not what I want from twice-baked. Usually, this indicates baked Idahos with their flesh scooped out, mixed with whatever fats and goodies the cook likes in them, then re-stuffed into the skin and baked again to reheat. These were disappointing, as were the plain old button mushrooms — they weren't even shiitakes. Sure, Bankers Hill is cheaper than Market, but I still want something special from this chef. The raw materials for the accompaniments could have come from produce-deficient Vons or a depressed Logan Heights mercado.

Crispy BBQ Braised Pork Tacos (hold on, just what does "BBQ Braised" mean?) offered tender, flavorful pork in crisp corn tortilla shells, loaded with pepper Jack, avocado, and herb-lime cream, and topped with avocado and a garden of greenery. They were a great deal better tasting (and cheaper) than the tacos I had at Barrio Star a couple of weeks ago. Sole quibble: the pork came in lumps, instead of being torn into shreds.

We hit a low spot with Hickory-Smoked Baby Back Ribs, which proved nearly a joke, the ribs heavily smeared with a "Sweet Chili BBQ Glaze" that evoked distress around the table. The spiciness was just right, but the sweetness was beyond excessive and the texture was glutinous. We ran through all the BBQ sauce recipes in our brains. Not molasses. Not brown sugar. Oh, no, it tasted like Karo — the original high-fructose corn syrup! Well, at least the meat is tender, and the accompanying large, light buttermilk biscuit is exquisite, American folk-baking at its best. Plus, you get hot, moist towels to clean your hands. You'll need them after you pick up and gnaw at those ribs, unless you're fool enough to try and use knife and fork.

The Lynnester has a passion for Bolognese sauce cooked by other people — "Three days of cooking all those meats," she said, "and in the end all you

get is good spaghetti sauce! It's worse than cassoulet!" I once tried making it (with Marcella Hazan's recipe) but promptly went back to my old Little Italy (New York) neighbor Antoinette's Neapolitan neverfail "gravy," which only takes three hours. So we ordered the Fettucine Bolognese here. The pasta, homemade, comes in wide rectangles, slightly overcooked, in a subtly seasoned tomato sauce (I think I smelled a top-note of nutmeg) thick with clumps of meat — meats of various flavors, evidently ground after they were braised. The sauce is amended by little clouds of goat cheese, the plate completed by baby spinach. I still think I like Antoinette's gravy better.

For those who want to move further downscale (e.g., the patio-bar crowd), the menu also offers a burger (\$14, and for \$3 more you get truffle fries), fish and chips (\$18.75), and an ever-changing sandwich — currently a French Dip (\$14.75).

Bankers Hill has a dessert chef, and the guys all wanted desserts. The only one worth mention is a butterscotch pudding, so sybaritic that the Emperor Caligula might have reveled in it. It's topped with whipped cream, and the depths hold a streak of chocolate syrup. Happily, my espresso was delivered with dessert, as ordered, and it was good.

It seems odd that the neighborhood of Banker's Hill, with its high-priced condos and million-dollar Craftsman cottages, should become a new hub of neighborhood-style restaurants (Cucina Urbana, Hexagone, Azuki Sushi, Hane Sushi, Barrio Star, and now this one). Our fellow diners didn't look like plutocrats. Maybe this is the new dining neighborhood for nearby areas without many restaurants, or lacking enough restaurants where people feel comfortable with the food or ambiance. At Bankers Hill, you'll be packed in cheek-by-jowl and forced to raise your voice to converse, but the menu won't pose any major challenges. It's modern American comfort food in a cosmopolitan mode — rarely thrilling but mainly very tasty and easy to enjoy. ■

unset's my kryptonite. Honest. Dusk is my undoing. I'm weakest when Huey's dipping his tootsies in the ocean. Food and drink-wise, anyway. Here at the Gaslamp

trolley stop around six, I can feel the magic hour a-coming. Plus, across the railroad tracks, left of the convention center, all scrubbed and white, that big pencil box of a Hilton keeps giving me the come-on, tempting as a Lorelei.

Hmm... The view will be fantastic over there. And, just maybe, they have a happy hour I can afford. I cross over the tracks and Harbor Drive, then head south. Two minutes later, I start to hear noise. Bunch of irate wasps? Stadium of vuvuzelas? I get closer. Now it sounds like a UFC fight crowd. I head for the doors in the Hilton, where the sound's coming from...and find myself in this vast sports bar, guys all cheering and talking big, looking up at two dozen plasma screens. Are we at the Tilted Kilt (you know, the sports bar next to Petco Park)? No. The sign says Fox Sports Grill. Fox, like, Sarah and Hannity and Glenn. That Fox.

It's dark, in creams and browns, with a black acoustic ceiling and a wall that looks like a Japanese paper screen. On the other side there's a pillbox view of the bay. It takes a moment to realize, but there's no music in here, just sports on TV, play by play, roar by roar, from the screens and also from the guys who are watching.

I sidle up to the bar, grab a stool and a mini-menu card. Hey hey! Lucked out. "Happy Hour, Monday to Friday, 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m." They have drink specials like \$1 off draft beer and \$2 off wines by the glass. The interesting part comes next: "Half-priced selected appetizers: sliders, chipotle pork sliders, BBQ chicken nachos, bleu cheese chips, and smoked wings."

"What do these appetizers cost?" I ask the bar girl, Genevieve.

She hands me a 20-inch matt-black plastic sheet. The main menu. It has starters, salads,

soups, and sandwiches, plus grills, burgers, pizzas. And not the sort of prices I'd expect at a Hilton. A buffalo chicken sandwich with cheese and fried onion rings, plus fries, runs \$9.95. A grilled chick-

> en strawberry salad is \$10.95 at lunch, two bucks more for dinner. Soup and salad is \$8.95. Of course, they do have big-ticket items, like jumbo lump crab cakes for \$20.95 or tenderloin filet for \$26.95. But lunch burgers cost from \$9-\$11.

The half-pound "Chop House" cheeseburger with fries is \$8.95; add caramelized onions, bacon, sautéed mushrooms, and melted Swiss, and you'll pay \$10.95.

And I would. But first, I flip the page back to Starters. Regular price for sliders is \$7.95. Chipotle pork sliders are \$8.95. BBQ chicken nachos go for \$7.95, bleu cheese chips (with bacon, tomatoes, bleu cheese sauce) are \$9.95, and smoked wings ("naked, buffalo, or spicy") are \$8.95.

Now, halve all that. Heckuva deal. I go for chipotle pork sliders — plate of three, about \$4.50. I add BBQ chicken nachos for \$4. Can't believe I'm paying that, here.

"Something to drink?" Genevieve asks. "How much for beers, at, uh, happy-hour prices?"


"About \$4, \$5, after the dollar off."

Then I remember I gotta work tonight. "Just give me a Coke," I say. It's \$2.50.

While I'm waiting, a waiter comes up with a plate loaded with greens and meat for the guy on my left. Dave. "Steak salad," he says. "It's \$15.95. Not happy hour, but you get a steak and a salad in the one price."

He's from Colorado. Works in medical equipment, showing surgeons how to use this backbone bracer his company makes. "I was observing at two operations yesterday," he says. "Surgeons sometimes need help with the mechanical details."

He brings out his iPhone. "Guess what anesthesiologists do while the op's going on?" He presses a button. The photo pans around from the surgeons, busy working on the sleeping

patient, to where this other doc in green scrubs sits...reading the Union-Tribune.

"Anesthesiologists are just there in case." Genevieve brings me a nice heavy knife and fork and a couple of black linen napkins. Very cool that they don't skimp for bargainhunters like me.

And then — whoa — my two plates turn up. One triangular china plate has three sliders oozing onions and pork, plus a logjam of fries. The other, a big oval dish, is loaded with red chips, black chips, yellow chips, and barbecued chicken chunks — also sliced jalapeños, onions, and white and red sauces spread like lava over the top. It's pretty good, but those chipotle sliders take the prize. They're

smoky, sweet, maybe even chocolatey — I'm even wondering: mole? They're filling, too. In fact, I have to ask for a box so I can take the last one home to Carla. She's never going to believe it came from the House of Hilton, for four bucks.

I head out along the Embarcadero. The bay's gone from sunny blue to the gold I saw staring out from the bar, and now it's blue-black. Lord. Stayed way beyond happy hour. Lights are beginning to twinkle. Large boats slide silently by. I stop for a large coffee (\$2.25) and a chocolate chip cookie (\$1.50) at the Seaport Cookie Company. Ah... Feel my strength seeping back. Hello, night. Bye-bye, kryptonite. ■

## **Loves Birds**

## "If there's a good chiropractor or cranialsacral therapist out there, call me."

ased in University Heights, Normandie Wilson is a self-taught pianist who worked as an accompanist in her small West Virginia town from middle school through high school.

"I grew up listening to 1960s music — Burt Bacharach, the Beach Boys, Motown — and watching birds with my grandma."



Wilson spent the past five years living in L.A. and playing with Red Pony Clock. "I was coming down [to San Diego] for shows and recording and everything. I moved here for good after a European tour with my last CD, which I released with Sebastian Clark. Here in San Diego I've been putting my focus on recording some new indie-pop material."

Her newest album, *The Flower Box*, was released last month. "I make DIY vintage 1960s pop music in the vein of Dusty Springfield and Dionne Warwick, and I also throw in a little bit of funk. I think if you placed Prince, Ben Folds, and the Carpenters in a blender, that might describe what I do. I also write a lot of instrumental pieces for unusual instruments, like the soundtracks done by Ennio Morricone."

In addition to music, Wilson is a visual artist who is endeavoring to paint or draw every known living species of bird, a quest that can be followed at *everysinglebird.com*. She also works with the San Diego Audubon Society's conservation committee.

## WHAT'S IN YOUR MUSIC PLAYER?

1. Keith Lockhart and the Boston Pops Orchestra, *Runnin' Wild.* "It's a nice recorded reinterpretation of some classic Glenn Miller songs without all the static and fuzz heard on the older recordings.

The fidelity of the record means you can hear the songs a little more like how they sounded when hearing them live back in the 1940s."

2. Mill Kids, A Zoo Full of Zebras. "This is Jordan

Michelman's record — he used to be in a Seattle band called Patience Please. He's a brilliant songwriter, and the CD is lo-fi bedroom pop,

very vulnerable, and I really enjoy that kind of stuff." 3. The Beach Boys, *Little Deuce Coupe/All Summer Long*. "At first listen, a record all about cars may seem shallow, but underneath everything you can hear all the harmonies and complex chords. I think it's fascinating to hear what they did with the songs back when they had to release a new record every three to six months."

4. Prince, *Controversy*. "Prince is one of my favorite artists of all time, right up there with the Beach Boys, and his vocal work on this record is masterful."

5. Birds & Batteries, *Up to No Good*. "I saw these guys at South by Southwest, and I was blown away.

guys at South by Southwest, and I was blown away. It's very sexy electropop funk mixed with raw vocals and other things that you might think don't fit with synthesizers, but they do. The production is flawless."

## **BEST ADVICE YOU EVER RECEIVED?**

"My dance-major mentor from Oberlin College, Elesa Rosasco, said to me, 'Everything takes longer than you think.' At first I felt really defeated that she said that. Then I got into the real world and saw this is often true. It helped me gain a lot of patience and to remain calm when things are taking longer than I want them to, whether it's getting traction in my career or getting a bagel for breakfast."

I really don't have many problems with my Mac, and I'm a sucker for the design."

## WHO SHOULD PLAY YOU IN A MOVIE?

"My only criteria would be that I'd want her to have a bump in her nose like I do, and I'd want her to be short. Maybe Kristen Bell? I Googled 'short actresses,' and that's what came up."

### **EVER BEEN A CRIME VICTIM?**

"As a pedestrian in L.A., I was hit by a car. Some dude was trying to make a lane where there wasn't one, and his side mirror struck me in the back of the shoulder. He drove off, but someone was able to flag him down. I got a small insurance settlement a while back, but it seems like my back hasn't really been the same. So if there's a good chiropractor or cranialsacral therapist out there, call me."

## WHERE DO YOU TAKE OUT-OF-TOWN GUESTS?

"Balboa Park and the Tijuana River Estuary. I also try to take everyone to the Linkery in North Park and Eclipse Chocolat on El Cajon Boulevard."

## **BEST THING YOU EVER WON?**

"A couple of weeks ago I attended climate-change training and won a pretty sweet water bottle. With no strings attached. I use it all the time. I haven't won too many things that don't come with strings attached."

If someone wants to grieve by saying I was a talentless hack with terrible fashion sense, well, go for it. I'm not gonna be there!"

## WHAT WOULD YOU DO IF YOU COULD SUDDENLY READ MINDS?

"I'd probably go insane because I'm very sensitive. I think I'd start by finding a way to turn the mindreading on and off. So many people carry around thoughts about their own inadequacy, their own unhappiness and fears...it's a scary world out there."

## **BRUSH WITH FAME?**

"I met Alec Baldwin when I was working in L.A. He's a lot better looking in person, and he was very kind. His daughter was with him, too, and he seemed like he was being a good dad to her."

## WORST MOVIE?

"Last week my roommates had  $Troll\ 2$  on. I think it was voted worst movie of all time, but I love those campy horror B-movies from the 1980s. The plot involves vegetarian trolls who feast on humans, who get turned into vegetation. Awful and awesome."

## SOMETHING ABOUT YOU FEW WOULD KNOW OR GUESS?

"I was one of the first three women in West Virginia to be able to pole vault as a sanctioned sport in track-and-field."



When people in the rest of the country or the rest of the world think about California, they think about sunshine and blondes at

the beach — still! They still think about that stuff! But those of us who have lived here for more than a couple of weeks know that there are a lot more Californians who don't fit the stereotype than Californians who do. And sometimes we get pretty angry about the unfairness of it all. That's part of the reason that in every California beach town you can find kids dressed in black, staying out of the sun, smoking cigarettes, and looking for trouble.

Crocodiles' leaders Brandon Welchez and Charles Rowell are two such misfits. They've been playing together since they were teenagers in San Diego bands such as the Plot to Blow Up the Eiffel Tower. They formed Crocodiles in 2008 and quickly started gathering national attention. especially after the band No Age placed Crocodiles' "Neon Jesus" on their list of best singles of the year. Last vear's Summer of Hate cemented Crocodiles' reputation

as Southern California's surliest discontents with song titles like "I Wanna Kill." distorted guitars and snarling vocals from the Jesus and Mary Chain playbook, narcotic rhythms à la the Spacemen 3, and a couple of electronic numbers from the krautrock school.

The forthcoming followup looks as if it will continue in the macabre vein of the debut - it's



titled Sleep Forever. But the title track sounds like a melodic shoegazer anthem, complete with a "la-la-la" chorus. If you want to get druggy about it, it sounds less like heroin and more like ecstasy. See what I mean? California is complicated.







# **Marion Brown:** Why Not?

CD Review by Andrew Hamlin

Float like a butterfly, abrade like sandpaper. Thus, the curious and fascinating dichotomy between band and bandleader on this. Marion Brown's second album for ESP-Disk. Originally released 42 years ago, the crucial beauty resides with drummer Rashied Ali, who played with John Coltrane from '65 until Coltrane's death in '67. One of the first drummers to disregard timekeeping and turn the drum kit into a palette equal with a

horn or a keyboard. Ali took a mighty intuitive leap.

Working breath-bybreath above Ali, pianist Stanley Cowell and bassist Norris "Sirone" Jones swap in and out as each other's shadows with the enthusiasm of

schoolchildren. Sirone gets busy, Cowell rushes on his heels. Cowell cools off, Sirone winds down to elegant and spare plunking. They could stand better recording levels (ESP-Disk sessions often started and finished on the cheap) but give the CD repeated spins, as you should, and you'll plunk yourself down in the picture.

Above them all, laying out for long minutes but snapping you to attention each comeback, Brown on alto sax stretches for stellar high squeaks, rolls out bopfriendly fast lines in the title cut, wavers, trails off, and occasionally bites down hard. He lets the others have fun, but when he comes in everyone snaps to attention.

Brown, no longer able to make music, stays in an assisted-living facility in Florida. He'll probably leave us there. Treasure the man while you can. Treasure the music down all the days.

# Wavves:

King of the Beach

Noise-pop trio Wavves deshackulates above the critic-infested waters of popular music. "You're never gonna stop me!" resounds San Diego native Nathan Williams on the title track, a singlefinger salute to those who dismissed Wavves' debut as a fuzzed-out. cursory experiment.

Taking Williams's on- and off-stage antics into account, including a canceled European tour (complete with hurled shoes, fistfights, and broken bottles), admitted substance indulgence, and subsequent public meltdown, it looked as if his righteous ride was over. But Wavves did what nobody expected: scrubbed up the chops, expanded to a trio, and traveled to Mis-

sissippi to record the promising King of the Beach.

Wavves dropped in at Sweet Tea Recording Studio with producer Dennis Herring (Elvis Costello, Counting Crows, Modest Mouse). The result is a sun-drenched psychedelic surf-pop record teeming with instantly catchy, punk-inflected tunes. Williams snarls and sneers throughout the album, surrounded by walls of jangling guitar, Beach Boys-inspired harmonies, and punch-you-in-the-mouth percussion.

On lead single "Post Acid," Williams admits, "understand...that I'm just having fun." This drugged-out, beach-slack mentality prevails throughout the collection, but it's perfect for the heat and haze of Cali summer days.

# Three-Bean Salad Blues

Concert Review by Mary Leary

A frosty-haired woman resembling the one who taunted Henry Chinaski in Barfly stares at the band, barely moving her hips. Friends and family crowd the stage, tapping on cameras. Black Bone Child's trek from Austin (a homecoming for two members ) feels triumphant, Women who can probably mix a mean three-bean salad approach the stage in shorts, heels, and other rock 'n' roll duds. As a Bo Diddlev riff opens sinewy stomper "Be Your Man," I flash on blues purist Seymour's reaction to the bar band in Ghost World. Seymour would undoubtedly be dismayed by BBC's unflagging supply of the kind of bump-and-grind to which I'm hesitant to react — hey, I don't

want to be mistaken for a pole dancer.

Although everything's intense, songs like "Light Up the Sky" invite even more screams from the audience. "Light Up" has the kind of delayed shuffle propelling Human League's "Rock 'n' Roll" into reptilian splendor. Mostly, BBC burns too urgently for delays. Like a passel of hot-blooded Southerners, it makes a good case for honorary induction — if not into Mississippi citizenship, at least unto the arms of Fat Possum. Kenneth's machine-gun harp and Donny's manic electric slide would sit well next to R.L. Burnside (effects version) or Jon Spencer. Hell, I wouldn't be surprised to see BBC give ZZ Top a run for its money.

The abundance of past tour T-shirts signaled that this was not the first Tool show for most of the audience, which was pummeled for two hours with intense, engrossing progressive metal.

The visual focus was not on the four men

onstage, but on the psychedelic artwork that pulsed and spiraled on large video screens. The set included popular singles "Stinkfist," "Schism," and "Forty-Six & 2."



Listen up, Los Angeles!

As on their last few tours, Tool performed only one song from their first full-length, 1993's *Undertow*. "Do you believe in time travel?" singer Maynard James Keenan asked before launching into the album's opening cut, "Intolerance." The highlight, however, was the finale of epic tracks "Lateralus" and "AEnema," a kiss-off to their hometown, "this hopeless fucking hole we call L.A." The crowd joined in, screaming lyrics condemning L. Ron Hubbard and "all his clones," guntoting gangster wannabes, and insecure actresses loud enough for their SoCal neighbors to hear.

Set between the Gaslamp District and Golden Hill, Wednesday's monthly-gone-fortnightly Dub Dorado packs the rustic lounge with a miscellany of Downtown clubbers, Uptown hipsters, and old-school dubstep and drum & bass heads. Bartenders in gold-miner getups serve Pabst tall cans (\$5) and specialty cocktails (\$9) while Otis the white buffalo head observes the revelry from his vantage point above the jukebox. Paintings of early America on rust-red walls, old-timey chandeliers, and a cattle-skull-and-pickax logo on the wood-cover menus craft the lounge's California Gold Rush aesthetic. DJs Reactivity, Headshake, Mr. Biggs, Austin Speed, and Pawn rattle paint chips off the ceiling with six 18-inch subwoofers while club photographers James Norton and Jeff "Turbo" Corrigan capture patrons in various states of abandon circulating between the dance floor, the "dudes" and "dames" rooms, and the

smoking patio out back.

No stranger to maxed-out dance nights, the lounge is regularly filled to capacity (190 people) when Lee "Groundfloor" Schneider's Young Guns, Adam Salter's Boys & Girls, and 5&A Dime/ Saul Q's Milk & Cookies are on the bill.

I return the following Monday evening to sample the house cocktails. Seven others populate the bar, which seats about 25, sipping drinks and making mellow conversation.

"These are the kind of nights I like to come out to," says bartender Josh as he places a Kentucky River (Buffalo Trace bourbon. cacao, and peach bitters) on the racy 1960s lacquered comic bar top, a remnant from the building's past as dive Hong Kong Nite Club. A Muppets movie plays on mute while Devo, Justice, and the Small Faces spin in the jukebox. A billiard table occupies

the dance floor. The vibe is relaxed — pure lounge, afterwork ambiance — the opposite extreme of Wednesday night's rager.

Owners and bona fide cocktail nerds (their blog insists that there is no such thing as a vodka martini) the Stanton brothers have creat-

ed a first-rate summer drink menu for 2010. If cocktails aren't your cup, El Dorado offers a handful of regular and seasonal drafts, a generous assortment of bottles and cans, and a connoisseur's selection of bourbons, whiskeys, and ryes.

Brian Mackey plays Leon Trotsky with an axe in his head for 36 hours; an elastic Steven Lone's the charlatan wordsmith in "The Universal Language"; Kim Strassburger's a monkey trying to write Hamlet from scratch (but coming closer to Milton's Paradise Lost) and Trotsky's multifaceted wife; and Karson St. John shows her remarkable range in several roles. Ives's title calls attention to technique. Under Glenn Paris and Claudio Raygoza's codirection, however, the actors never make one aware of their "timing." Instead they sustain focus on Ives's truly wacko situations.

# Harvey

In the first 18 drafts of her classic comedy, Mary Chase envisioned an actor playing Harvey: a sixfoot, or six-foot-three-and-a-half invisible white rabbit. At the Boston tryout, an actor wore a \$600 costume, but looked like an actor playing a rabbit. So Chase made Harvey invisible ("more real," she said in an interview). She won a Pulitzer Prize. For audiences who favor subtle, nuanced acting, the Lamb's Players production may require an adjustment. Everyone except David Cochran Heath (splendid as the convivial, egalitarian Elwood P. Dowd) pole vaults their characters over the top. In director Robert Smyth's inventive conception, even though he talks to a "pookah" (an invisible fairy spirit; a "puck" in England). Elwood's the sanest one around. Smyth makes Harvey a comedy not of manners but of neurotics, some of whom begin to grow. As Elwood's sister Veta, for example, Kerry Meads begins WAY out there: a tangle of words and gestures. As the play proceeds and she encounters Harvey's calming aegis, Veta sheds neuroses along the way. As do the others (thanks to fine ensemble work). Mike Buckley's handsome set swivels from scene to scene. Jeanne Reith's mid-'40s costumes and Nathan Peirson's lighting sustain an antic mood. (Note: Due to popular demand, Lamb's has extended the show's run.) Worth a try.





# King Lear

In Adrian Noble's valuable book, How to Do Shakespeare, the former artistic director of the Royal Shakespeare Company teaches a master class on the subject. His direction of King Lear at the Old Globe puts his teachings into practice. I have never heard the story told better. Like Coriolanus, whose "heart's his mouth," the cast makes thought and speech one. Bruce Turk's nimble Fool, Catherine Gowl's firm Cordelia, Jonno Roberts's Edmund (as funny as he is vile), and especially Iav Whittaker's multi-voiced Edgar make each moment brand new. Robert Foxworth's Lear begins puffed up and regal and ends. 20 years older, like a dying candle extinguished by its wax. But his always-competent performance lacks size. Foxworth could tweak the narcissism and suggest that it masks a profound instability at the King's core. Deirdre Clancy's costumes begin upscale, in the 18th Century, and then fan out as they come forward in time. Ralph Funicello's spare set includes dark, castle-high walls and autumn leaves on the floor (swept away in the wintry second act). Shaun Davey's original music handles the entrances well but is absolutely unnecessary when Lear and Cordelia reunite (she, strangely, not in his arms). At this point the audience doesn't need music to tell them how to feel! (Note: King Lear runs in repertory with The Taming of the Shrew and The Madness of George III; call the theater for days and times of each.) Critic's pick.

# The Last Romance

It helps that Joe Di Pietro wrote this lightweight charmer for Marion Ross and her husband Paul Michael. Their backstory proves that the play's theme is

possible. Eighty-three-year-old Raphael Bellini (two great Italian artists in one name) has walked the same walk for years. In a play loaded with life-changing events, he takes a different path and meets Carol Reynolds. They slowly grow together (but have secrets, and will they become like an opera's plot: people meet but can't get together "because life gets in the way"?). The script's complications are predictable and a mite forced. What works is Ross and Michael's interplay. The actors are obviously having fun meeting each other, as it were, for the first time. Patricia Conolly plays Ralph's potentially spurned sister Rose with crusty conviction. Joshua Jeremiah performs during scene changes with a big, operatic voice. And in keeping with the theme, designer Alexander Dodge crowns the stage with a wreath of autumn leaves

# The Madness of George III

In Alan Bennett's drama, "mad King George" isn't. Unlike King Lear, whose mania sears his synapses, George only has the symptoms, but enough of them to prompt the Regency Crisis of 1788 (since his condition could topple the government). A battery of doctors, a hypochondriac's nightmare in powdered wigs, try to heal the king but only exacerbate the condition. At the Old Globe, Miles Anderson plays George III like an inverted iceberg: deep down, at the tip, he's sane. Everything else becomes a burden that Andrews, in an exceptional performance, overcomes, thanks to a man named Willis Under Adrian Noble's inventive direction (the cast runs in and out of eight mirrored double doors with the speed of farce). the Globe's summer festival intersects in Willis: his authoritarian tactics recall Petruchio (in Shrew); and Robert Foxworth plays Willis and also King Lear (to whom George is often compared). Andrew Dahl's a kick as the Prince of Wales, a corpulent poseur, Emily Swallow gives the Queen a loving patience, and Jay Whittaker's William Pitt exudes an almost insane ferocity. Bruce Turk, Adrian Sparks, and Joseph Marcell make the attending physicians (and their medieval cures) eerily absurdist. But like the king, they only seem mad (Note: Madness runs in repertory with King Lear and The Taming of the Shrew.)

# A Midsummer Night's Dream

In Christopher Ashley's staging, when the lovers flee Athens, the world turns upside-down. A piano dangles midair, and a chandelier rises from the floor. The lovers don't escape to a wood, they enter a Cirque du

Soleil dreamscape. The director has encouraged near-constant movement, accompanied by a live orchestra playing Mendelssohn. But the activity often upstages the speakers. The real "juice" in Dream isn't Puck's love-concoction, it's the language. Few in the cast relish it (Ionathan McMurtry's tyrannical Egeus, Daniel Oreske's sometimes stiff Theseus/Oberon, and Charlayne Woodard's Hippolyta/Titania). Others treat it like utilitarian prose, especially Lucas Caleb Rooney as Bottom; he's deaf to verbal jokes ("I see a voice" should get a big laugh, for example). In the end, the rational Theseus says dreams and fantasies are just "airy nothing"; Hippolyta says they can "grow to something of great constancy.' The playhouse's *Dream*, though visually stunning and often entertaining, aligns more with Theseus than Hippolyta.





D) in which mobsters move in on rival territory and recriminations abound. Rupert Holmes's book isn't bad. It's got banter and snappy one-liners (asked whose idea it was to rob from the rich and give to the poor, Willie replies, "Karl Marx?"), but it's based on showbiz personalities, not developed fictional characters. It requires the indomitable, "top of the heap" Rat Pack aura to pull it through. Mere mortals, even backed by firstrate direction and spectacular bursts of choreography, pale in comparison. Look past surface pizzazz, and Robin's feels like an imitation. The Cahn/Van Huesen parade of hits make it enjoyable nonetheless.

Richard Sherman's wife, of seven years, and children are away on vacation. He has the apartment to himself and his lively subconscious, which conjures up a sexual tryst with a new upstairs neighbor (called "The Girl"). Owing to a near accident,

deus ex potted tomatoes, and unlike the original, fantasy becomes reality. The play, reset by New Village Arts to 1959, is early Simon-lite. Director Amanda Sitton nicely orchestrates the farce and adds a strong period flavor (the women, in particular, dress and move pure late-Fifties). Onstage throughout, and with impressive timing, Daren Scott

makes Richard a nexus of quirks and questions. Jason Bieber's quick-cut lighting mirrors Richard's perplexities. Though she could be more attracted to Richard, Jacque Wilke's Girl talks the period talk beautifully (both crisp and rapid fire). Eddie Yaroch, as a funny, vein-bulging psychologist, and Melissa Fernandes, a hoot as Richard's wife (who really goes off on him), offer strong support work. Tim Wallace's set, the apartment interior, and miniature New York exterior, ranks among his best.

He and Kate (Emily Swallow) experience love at first sight, and she goes along with him. The strategy works, at least until the curtain falls. Roberts and Swallow are always entertaining, but it's hard to believe that even a Kate in love could withstand Petruchio's boot camp tactics. Bruce Turk (Grumio) and Donald Carrier (Hortensio) head a strong supporting cast (Bree Welch and Shirine Babb, as Bianca and a rich widow, suggest that marriage to these newlyweds will be no honeymoon). The director turns Ralph Funicello's spare, useful set into a hybrid world: part Late-Renaissance, part today, the latter including moves and gestures for the groundling in us all. Worth a try.



# Mideast Meets West

It combines the quite separate attractions of the travelogue and the tearjerker.

ne of the promises of the independent cinema, seldom fulfilled, is that it take up the jobs abdicated by today's

Hollywood. The job taken up in *Cairo Time* is, no condescension intended, that of the women's film. (The in-

exact synonym, chick flick, always intends condescension.) And taken up, at that, with consummate skill and invisible effort, making it look easy. Written and directed by a woman not at all a prerequisite of the genre and a new name, the Arab-Canadian Ruba Nadda, it recounts the first visit to the Middle East of a contented American working wife, now facing Empty Nest Syndrome with two children flown, planning to meet up with her husband in Cairo to see the pyramids together. The husband, a United Nations emissary overseeing a refugee camp in Gaza, is detained

incommunicado in circumstances of uncertain danger, and in his stead he has dispatched a former employee of his, a native Egyptian who in retire-

> ment has inherited his father's coffee shop (best coffee in the world if he says so himself), to look

after the woman in the meantime. show her around, keep her company. As the days stretch out indefinitely, with attendant loss of bearings, a bond forms between them and ever so imperceptibly tightens, notwithstanding the hovering presence of a widowed old flame of the man, plainly still interested in him. You can see how it all would happen. You can believe it implicitly. In time, a slight infidelity will be committed (those pyramids won't wait forever), but how great a one is open for discussion, although apparently not open for it between reunited spouses.



Cairo Time

In synopsis it sounds like nothing. In actual experience it feels like one of the foremost things the cinema was made for, taking us away, setting us down, putting us deeply into a scene — an exotic scene for extra measure — with a knowledgeable, alert, sensitive, and subtle eye to guide us. It combines, and completely merges, the quite separate attractions

of the travelogue and the tearjerker. On the first front the filmmaker misses no trick: the lit pyramid looming in the distance over an evening party, or unlit in daylight over a golf course; the commercial belly dancer; the dromedary; the lunarscape rock formations; the water pipe ("Oh, it's apple!"); the mosque; the bazaar; the boat ride on the Nile; the carpet weav-

ing; the traditional wedding. A full and satisfying itinerary, sometimes intensely subjective, as in the overhead point-of-view shots from the heroine's hotel balcony, or in her solo stroll through the streets in short-sleeve blouse and knee-length skirt, drawing men like flies and daggerish glares from hijab-wearing women. Clearly she has much to learn.

The second front, the warming relations between man and woman, is attended with no less thoroughness and intentness and far less roaming. There is, despite the differences that need to be noted and examined, no cumbersome ideological baggage for them to lug, as in, say, Sally Potter's insufferably pretentious Yes, no great barriers, no terrible tensions, no cultural soulsearching. The film offers up no thesis, simply two people. These are decidedly civilized people, urbane and gracious, people who can talk to one another with tact and candor and eloquence, photographed the whole while in comfortable, roomy images that, even as they let in plenty of the environment, refuse to push the

pair upon one another or upon the spectator. The woman in question is "indie" queen Patricia Clarkson (in the Hollywood of yore it might have been Joan Fontaine or Deborah Kerr), who, for all the beauty of her plangent voice and soulful eyes, does not cut herself off from the common run of womankind, blinding us with radiant celebrity, untouchable pulchritude. She seems a real woman. The man, the long-stemmed, looselimbed, neatly bearded Alexander Siddig, is no Omar Sharif, which is to say no cornball matinee idol, but rather a suave, discreet, old-world gentleman who succeeds - as he must for the film to succeed — in being irresistibly attractive. We come to care a great deal about these two, without having a clear rooting interest. Uncertainty sees to that. (We've not yet met the husband; we've only heard the wife on the phone with

him.) A younger European woman on the scene, having had intimate relations with an Arab, weighs in with cautionary testimony: great lover but eventually possessive. "It always comes out." Will it have a chance to come out in some form here? The emotional climax — a premature climax, so to speak, abrupt, disruptive — can jerk a tear without half seeming to try. In under ninety minutes the film fully achieves the task it set itself, a task bigger and tougher than it might look.

Eat Pray Love, by a convenient coincidence, is what passes nowadays in the mainstream, however infrequently, as a women's film, a selfaffirming, boastful, best-selling piece of nonfiction Chick Lit transformed into a two-and-a-quarter-hour blandishment for a major star. It is a virtual photographic negative of Cairo Time. Whatever the other does right, this one does wrong. While there is a lot of sightseeing on the heroine's Search for Self ("I want to go someplace where I can just marvel"), Italy for food, India for meditation, Indonesia for romance — the three I's on the road to the central, the egotistical I — it is all of the whirlwind variety, flitting, dizzying, bustled along with dictatorial pop songs, opera aria, indigenous instrumentals, and shot, what's more, in mushy focus and muddy color. (Ryan Murphy of Running with Scissors, director and whip-cracking tour guide.) We're probably lucky to be allowed to see anything at all around the screeneclipsing face of the leading lady, a gaunt Julia Roberts laughably cast a lusty eater, heedless of packing in

the pasta and packing on the pounds. Billy Crudup, James Franco, Luca Argentero, old bald Richard Jenkins (romanticizingly said to look just like James Taylor), and Javier Bardem, in various states of emasculation, are her men-in-waiting, the last-named the anointed Prince Charming at the end of the trail of arbitrary rejects. Insights acquired along the way, often talked out in first-person narration, boil down to glib one-liners, bromides, even bumper stickers (dolce far niente, translated the sweetness of doing nothing). On balance more comic than dramatic, more smartypants than smart, more chick flick than women's film, it is as irredeemably bad as Sex and the City 2, bad as anything all year.

Animal Kingdom gives us Australian cops-and-robbers and three solid characterizations, James Frecheville as an almost catatonic callow youth (casting glances at a TV game show as paramedics administer to his unresponsive OD'd mother on the couch), Jacki Weaver, a bottleblonde little dumpling of a woman, as the sugar-coated monstrous materfamilias of a nuclear crime family ("I'm having trouble finding a positive spin," she crumbles slightly after a son's death), and a mustached Guy Pearce as the gently persuasive police detective. Otherwise nothing to shout about as the dramatis personae get methodically mowed down. Instead I take the occasion to mention something that has been slowly, slowly driving me mad, building, building to this unavoidable boil-over: the consistent chopping-off of the tops of heads on the wide screen. The director here, David Michôd, cannot be branded an especially egregious offender for what has become pretty much the

norm, too common to be explained as bad framing on the part of a random projectionist, actors shot from the hairline or the eyebrows down, the lack of headroom giving every conversation the appearance of taking place under an umbrella. I would only want to point out, only want to scream out, that there exist a couple of time-honored alternatives. There is, first, no law that savs you have to shoot people close up on a wide screen not suited to closeups, and second, no law that says you have to shoot a film in widescreen if you insist on shooting dialogues in closeup. Once in a while for super-duper, collar-grabbing intensity, okay. But all the time? Standard operating procedure? It would be nice to be able to see the new norm as some exciting innovation or trend instead of, as I see it, directors and cinematographers not knowing anymore how to compose an image. It would be nearly as nice to be able, maybe someday, no longer to notice it. ■

One can be prepared to believe all manner of bad things about Christians without believing that their silencing of this solitary independent voice, this feminist demigoddess, set back the cause of astronomy by more than a millennium. **Despicable Me** — Computer cartoon available, but not imperative, in 3-D. Admittedly the Universal logo, our planet on a blanket of stars, looks good in 3-D, and the closing credits have some fun with the extra dimension, trying with the aid of an outthrusting steel tape measure to see how far off the screen the image can jump. If the whole film were as in-your-face as that, the extra expense for the glasses would have been well worth it, but the tape measure measures nothing so much as the nonaggression, the impassivity, of the rest of the film. The premise represents the very depth of inspiration: an ineffectual arch villain (a lugubrious Gorey-esque figure whose head levels off at the eyebrows, a penguin torso atop ostrich legs, a twelvefoot muffler wound around his neck), his workshop of elfish helpers in the thimble shape of Pac-Man monsters, a younger and goonier rival villain in a bowl haircut and square-rimmed glasses, and three too-cute orphans who change the course of criminality. The noisy musical score strives to make the action seem more rousing than it is, and the amusing Slavic accents of Steve Carell and Julie Andrews (as the principal villain's withholding mother) make up to some extent for deficiencies in the dialogue Kristen Wiig's churchy Southern accent adds something, too, to the stereotypical cruel directress of Miss Hattie's Home for Girls. Dinner for Schmucks — Softened. mushed-up remake of a rather distasteful French farce, called here The Dinner Game. concerning a clique of fat cats who periodically convene for a soirée to which each of them for their shared amusement brings along an unwitting idiot to compete for the laurel of biggest idiot. For the American mass market, the focal fat cat (Paul Rudd) has been made leaner and hungrier, a sympathetic, reluctant participant forced to jump through this hoop for job advancement. The focal idiot (Steve Carell) has meanwhile been so grotesqued — a buck-toothed, four-eyed dolt in a oversized hooded lavender nylon windbreaker, an IRS pencil pusher whose off-hours hobby is the construction of miniature tableaus with dead mice — that no idiots in the audience are at risk of identifying with him

and taking offense, and yet he's not so irredeemable an idiot that he cannot learn and teach important life lessons in the last act. Any sensitive viewer will be compelled to surrender his sense of moral or intellectual superiority by wanting fervently to kill the bumbling idiot for turning the fat cat's life upside down in the twenty-four hours prior to the dinner, or else to kill the fat cat for enabling the idiot to do it. Mystery fans' alarm bells will begin ringing even before the girl's favorite uncle explains how

she was in the habit of giving him an annual framed botanical and how he has continued annually to receive an anonymous framed botanical which he theorizes has been sent tauntingly by her killer. Kooky theory. Perhaps our indignity over the multiple revelations of ugly sexual violence is hoped to blind us to the shoddy plotting and the plodding development. (That, and perhaps also the cracklingly crisp photography.) 



Thus, there's a food-film ingredient from the shelf of Babette's Feast, Big Night, Like Water for Chocolate, Mostly Martha. and the like — a sensual awakening, for example, to a glistening plate of prawns, enclosing the heroine in her own personal spotlight — as well as a Chatterley-esque attunement to the world of flowers, berries bugs. Filmmaker Luca Guadagnino exhibits a painstaking attention to detail — the weather, the light, the living spaces, the furnishings, the silent comings and goings of the servants — and he closely monitors emotional temperatures, gelid to red-hot. His direction is littered with fussy, prinking little touches that jump out at you rather than coalesce into a coherent style And the running-in-place music of John Adams is an intermittent irritant. **Inception** — A major snow job from fair-haired filmmaker Christopher Nolan, nominally a science-fiction thriller focussed on some sort of psychic superspy (Leonardo DiCaprio, fully earning the furrow between his brows), an expert in the gentle art of "extraction," the stealing of conscious ideas from people when their guard is down in dreamland, now assigned the more difficult task of "inception," the planting of an idea in that same vulnerable state. Even for science fiction, the mumbo-jumbo to explain how all this works is exceptionally skimpy and unscientific; and the headlong propulsion of the plot, a vessel of commotion rather than of cogitation, allows no time for the mumbo-jumbo to sink in. The axiom that would seem to apply, the axiom that would seem to have been mislaid, is that if an artist is going to do something so "original" — as opposed to something as well-worn and easily understood as a time machine or a teleportation device — he must take care to instruct, to lav out the rules and regulations, to show the viewer the ropes. Else it's wildest whimsy, freest fancy. It might just be possible that if the



viewer were to sit through this a second or third time, he might better come to know what's what. But a bloated running time of two and a half hours rather discourages that. On a first go-round, he's apt to find that the dream state decreases any caperfilm tension and reduces the goings-on to mere spectacle. You just sit and watch. You don't worry. You don't care. And under the influence of the key piece of strategy from Nolan's The Dark Knight, namely Hans Zimmer's unrelenting grinding throbbing pounding music, you might crave either an aspirin or an antidepressant. The Kids Are All Right — Carefully drawn family portrait in a rough, grainy, indifferent image, a "nontraditional" family let's swiftly say: two lesbian "Moms' or "Momses" with a biological son and daughter old enough to be curious as to the identity of their sperm-donor dad, who turns out to be a health-food restaurateur and organic gardener stuck in a sort of Sixties time warp: "Right on, right on. Cool. I love lesbians." There is perhaps a whiff of self-consciousness in the initial laying-out of the family dynamic, but that's not as egregious as the audienceconsciousness of the plotty pot-stirring, the salacious lip-smacking, whereby the same-sex parents worry about the company their son keeps and wonder whether he's gay, and whereby, much worse, one of them succumbs to heterosexual temptation with, of all people, the laid-back sperm donor. All of the characters are nevertheless human and likable, even the one, believe it or not, played by Mark Ruffalo, even the teenagers, Mia Wasikowska and Josh Hutcherson. Director and co-writer Lisa Cholodenko shows a keen ear for modern talk and vogue vocabulary ("eco-friendly," "micromanaging," "counterintuitive," "composting," "heirloom tomatoes," "acai," etc.), and, assuming she knows what she's talking about, it's educational to learn why a lesbian couple would keep handy a DVD of gay male porn. Then too, whatever the contrivances, we get to watch two supremely skilled actresses at work, Annette Bening and Julianne Moore. 2010

Salt — The Cold War refrozen: a subterranean population of Russian "sleeper" agents in a Destroy America operation that dates back to Lee Harvey Oswald. For a short time the film, like its patient spies, puts up a decent front Director Phillip Novce, who owns such respectable credits in the genre as Patriot Games and The Quiet American, oversees some nice subjective camerawork and high-pressure closeups, and he reaches a pitch of intensity in nothing flat. Liev Schreiber, Chiwetel Ejiofor, and Daniel Olbrychski all bring a compelling measure of commitment, and although Angelina Jolie in the title role of Evelyn Salt, ultra-modern Mata Hari, is so chiselled as to look out of place anywhere but in the funny pages, she reveals in the early going some becoming agitation and vulnerability. But then the chase is on, and is thereafter never really off. Huff-puff, huff-puff. Much like the deep-cover Russkies who finally drop their disguises, but much sooner, the film stops pretending to be a legitimate espionage drama and reveals itself for the silly dilly that it is, our saline protagonist altogether transforming herself into a cookie-cutter Kick-Ass Chick. The aficionado's sense of betrayal and outrage cannot be less acute than Uncle Sam's. The mindless action fan on the other hand, or more precisely the mindless fan of mindless action, should have no complaints, except maybe that even he'll be a step ahead of the revelations.

Scott Pilgrim vs. the World — More

accurately Scott Pilgrim vs. Seven Evil Exes, six guys and one girl whom he must in some sense "defeat" in order to win the hand of the pink-haired, then blue-haired, then green-haired girl of his dreams. (Literally she first appeared to him, on skates, in a dream.) The serial conflicts, supernatural martial-arts contests punctuated with spelled-out sound effects in the style of the old Batman television show ("WHUMP!"), are so deep into fantasy that even a shoulderless wimp such as Michael Cera can compete, untrained, on equal footing. So deep indeed that we lose touch with the metaphor. In what sense, and why, must he best these out-of-thepicture rivals? The ironic facial expression of Mary Elizabeth Winstead, her raisedevebrow skepticism, is very fetching even if not very revealing. Still, the singular triumph of this hard-trying movie is that Cera manages to hang onto his humanity. his Canadian modesty, his individualistic deft touch, his sidelong delivery of lines, amid all the brassy pop-culture selfconsciousness, the comic-bookishness and video-gamesmanship, the distancing devices (superimposed title on a new setting: "Fun fact: This place is a toilet"), and the sophomoric cleverness of British director Edgar Wright (Shaun of the Dead, Hot Fuzz). Wright's best gambits, which have the practical purpose of speeding the action along in addition to the purely ornamental purpose of showing off, are the dreamlike scene changes in mid-dialogue. **Toy Story 3** — The second sequel adds little but minutes to the previous one, and for a computer-animated children's film it adds quite a lot of those, somewhere in the neighborhood of a hundred and five. In specific, the new 3-D adds little (but four dollars of admission) to the prevailing depth of field and openness of space. And the plot premise of the toys' boy going off to college, under orders from Mom to consign his childish things to either the attic or the trash, adds little to the torturous themes of change, aging, loss, death, that accrued from the prior premise of his going off to summer camp. Oh, the introduction of a Ken doll, a head of hair like a cowpat, at a hellish day-care center ("No one appreciates clothes here, Barbie"), adds some homo jokes suitable for the whole family, and the reprogramming of Buzz Lightvear to Spanish-language mode adds a benign Latin stereotype, but the de rigueur exhausting and exasperating finale (into the jaws of the landfill!) puts the capper on the general feeling of prolongation. Winter's Bone — Poky, low-key, somewhat parsimonious rural thriller with a simple set-up: if absent Dad, arrested for "cooking crank," the new moonshine of the Ozarks, fails to show for his court date, the family stands to lose the house he signed over for bond, and so it falls to his eldest daughter, not to the two young 'uns or the vegetative mother, to track him down, one redneck lowlife after another. The cloak of backwoods secrecy, to say nothing of the dialect, is so thick that it's difficult to determine where the threat might come from, or how, or why, and consequently difficult to share in the experience of the stoical seventeen-year-old who is at the center of every scene. We, far more than she, are in a figurative fog. But the atmosphere, even without literal fog, is also thick, no thanks to the greeny image or the arm-weary camerawork, and no need of the gratuitous skinning of a squirrel; and the authentic faces would appear to have been collected from the Depression photos of Dorothea Lange, including in a bit part a still recognizable Sheryl Lee, the murdered homecoming queen of Twin Peaks two decades earlier, and including, too, the angelic Jennifer Lawrence, who blends in well in the lead role and only occasionally looks as though she could be a spokesmodel for Pond's Cold Cream. A severe but underappreciated American drug problem (sometimes deadly and often expensive) is patients' failure to take prescribed medications — even to save their own lives (such as with anti-coagulants or cholesterolregulating statins). In recent pilot programs, according to a June New York Times report, compliance rates have been significantly improved — by giving patients money (\$50 to \$100 a month, sometimes more) if they remember to take their drugs. Data show that such compliance subsidies reduce society's overall healthcare costs by preventing expensive hospital admissions.

### **Government in Action**

Labor unions' sweet, recession-proof contract with the New York City area's severely cash-strapped Metropolitan Transportation Authority last year provided 8,074 blue-collar workers (conductors, engineers, repairmen, etc.) with six-figure compensation, including about 50 who earned \$200,000 or more. Researchers cited by the New York Times in April found that one Long Island Rail Road conductor made \$239,148, about \$4,000 more than the MTA's chief financial officer and about \$48,000 short of being the highest-paid person in the

entire system. Included in some of the fat payouts for LIRR locomotive engineers was special "penalty" pay (about \$94,600, in one case) for engineers who are required to move a train to a different location from its normal assignment.

- Arizona recently implemented a \$1.25 million federal grant in order to attempt saving the lives of at least five squirrels a year. The state's 250 endangered Mount Graham red squirrels risk becoming roadkill on Route 366 near Pima, and the state is building a rope bridge for them to add to several existing tunnels.

### **Great Art!**

— At a June concert in Australia's Sydney Opera House, American musicians Laurie Anderson and Lou Reed performed Anderson's 20-minute, very-high-pitched composition "Music for Dogs," an arrangement likely to have been largely unmelodious to humans, who generally cannot hear such high pitches, but of more interest to dogs, who can. (Dogs were permitted in the audience, but news reports were inconclusive about their level of enjoyment.)

- Many jihadist recruiting pitches are dry and pious, but in May, the Somali activist Abu Mansoor al-Amriki, 26, who was born in Alabama, began streaming internet rap "music" videos to encourage warrior sign-ups. (Sample verse: "It

all started out in Afghanistan/ When we wiped the oppressors off the land/ The Union crumbled and tumbled/ Humbled, left them mumbled/ Made a power withdraw and cower.") Actually, there was no music but merely al-Amriki singing, presumably because in the version of Islam favored by Somali jihadists, "music" is not permitted.

### **Fine Points of the Law**

- In Rehoboth Beach, Del., it is illegal for men and women to publicly reveal their genitals and for women to reveal their breasts, but police chief Keith Banks, confronted in June with complaints about some beachgoers flouting their shapely breasts, said there was nothing he could do. Banks said the offenders were actually biological males in the midst of hormonal transgendering. As Banks explained, "[T]hey had male genitalia. Therefore, they were not guilty of a crime."

In April, Prince Edward Island (Canada) judge John Douglas acquitted minor-league hockey player Chris Doyle of assaulting his former girlfriend, though Doyle had arrived at her home uninvited, had annoyed and berated her, and would not leave. The girlfriend was injured when Doyle punched a door, causing it to smash against her face, but Judge Douglas ac-

cepted that Doyle did not know she was behind the door. Said the judge, "If he was charged with being a colossal asshole, I would find him guilty. Of 'assault causing bodily harm,' I find him not guilty."

### **Bizarre Politics**

- While still chairman of the Florida Republican Party, Jim Greer ordered the continuous shuttling of emergency "notes" to him during a Republican National Committee meeting, and according to an April Orlando Sentinel profile, the "notes" were all blank. A Florida RNC official concluded that Greer was trying to make himself appear important to his colleagues. (In June, Greer was indicted on six felony counts related to raiding the state party's treasury.)

— At a forum in May for county school-board aspirants in Orlando, Fla., candidate John Mark Coney took the floor to read passages from the Bible and then to emphasize his suitability for office by announcing that he, at age 53, is a virgin.






