UNDER THE RADAR

Out of the passed Once again presi-

dential election season is about to begin, with potential GOP candidates jostling for position in a crowded and confusing pack. A few possible contenders have already made their way to San Diego County to pick up campaign cash. Of special note is Minnesota's conservative firebrand Republican congresswoman Michele Bachmann, who got \$1000 from retired weight-loss magnate Jenny Craig of Rancho Santa Fe, as well as \$500 from real estate investor John Peck Jr....Meanwhile, ex-San Diego lawyer and politico Byron Georgiou is trying to carve out a new career in Nevada, where he's running for the U.S. Senate seat vacated by scandalplagued Republican John Ensign, who resigned last month, unable to revive his political fortunes following news of his affair with his top aide's wife.

A onetime political prodigy here, Georgiou was legal affairs secretary for Democratic governor Jerry Brown during the early 1980s and ran for Congress in a 1990 Democratic primary against incumbent Jim Bates, who had been reproved by the House Ethics Committee in a 1989 sexual harassment case. Georgiou lost out to Bates by a 3 to 2 margin but was widely blamed by local Democrats for softening up the incumbent, who was taken down that November by Republican Randy "Duke" Cun**ningham**, who is today serving a federal prison term on bribery and corruption charges.

In 1992, Georgiou again lost out in a nasty Democratic congressional primary, this time to Lynn Schenk, another ex-Brown aide. In that battle, Georgiou sued Schenk for libel and slander, citing Schenk's campaign advertising, which featured allegations that Georgiou was a "professional liar," among other things. Georgiou went into the casino business and worked with La Jolla's legendary securities lawyer Bill Lerach in pursuing his fraud case against Enron. Top lobbying dogs San

Diego's Qualcomm Inc. has already spent \$1,930,000 on federal lobbying through May 2, according to the website OpenSecrets.org. That's more or less on the same pace as in 2010, when the cell phone giant spent \$6,500,000 for the entire year. It compares with the \$340,000 year to date spent by dronemaker General Atomics, which rang up a 2010 total of \$2,020,000. Sempra Energy has spent \$230,000 this year; last year the company paid out \$1,010,000. Synthetic Genomics, run by genetic engineer and UCSD alumnus J. Craig Venter, has spent \$80,000 so far this year; last year the company spent \$320,000.

Not Much to Brag About

e may not suffer an economic double dip, but we're in for double trouble, and it could last several more years. Both

in the nation and San Diego, recent signs of weakness portend more years of high unemployment, receding home values, anemic construction, soft consumer spending, slow manufacturing, pain from excessive debt, and only moderately improving tourism.

San Diego enjoys one advantage: growing employment in tech, particularly biotech. On the other hand, one-fifth of the San Diego economy is tied to the military (both weaponry and payroll), and there is talk of cutbacks. Remember the early 1990s? The nation got a peace dividend; San Diego got a piece of poop in the kisser as aerospace companies closed down and engineers were laid off en masse. There are a number of

long-standing problems that have come together to bring the American economy down. Beginning in the 1980s, consumers, governments, and financial institutions piled up far too much debt. Wall Street went on a speculative binge. Then came the 2007-early 2009 crash. Washington came to the rescue of the financial institutions, handing them trillions of near-zero interest rate dollars for a record length of time.

That caused a double whammy. The stock and bond markets thrived on the cheap money. But the value of the dollar plummeted as the Federal Reserve, in

effect, kept printing more bucks. Commodities, which are denominated in dollars, soared in price. So American families were hit with higher food and fuel prices. The big rise of financial asset prices boosted the wealth and incomes of the richest 10 percent, who control 80 percent of stock and bond wealth, but the lower 90 percent suffered from inflation and sagging incomes.

Thus we suffered a twotier recovery. The wealthiest 10 percent were gleeful; the rest were glum as the gap between the rich and the rest widened. Not surprisingly, consumer confidence polls show Americans' mood stumbling along at 25 to 30 percent below the normal level. And consumer spending is 70 percent of the economy.

Economically, San Diego has been doing somewhat more poorly than the nation as a whole. The unemployment rate in the county has generally been above 10 percent while the nation's has been a notch below dou-

No Fun on Game Day

The surprise witness identified the defendant right away. "He sits in front of us at the Charger games," said Sara Anderson.

She had video and photographs of him at the game on the night of the fatal crash. John Francis Sudac Jr. was

accused of hitting a car on I-5 in Solana Beach, then fleeing while a woman lay dead on the pavement.

A smashed silver Nissan Altima abandoned at the scene was registered to Sudac, and investigators located him. But the other man in Sudac's car was not identified,

so Sudac's defense attorney began building a case to raise reasonable doubt as to who was driving the Nissan at the time of the crash.

Anderson is not scarylooking, but she may have frightened Sudac when he saw her walk into the courtroom. It was more than two years after the crash when she entered the witness box. Anderson looked at Sudac, who was seated at the defense table, and said that she recognized him. "He has helped me and my mom take pictures of ourselves," said Anderson, who likes to take a camera to Chargers games. She and her mom are season ticketholders.

When the Bolts bested the Indianapolis Colts in a playoff game on Saturday night, January 3, 2009, Anderson

panned the crowd with her camera.

The fans went to their feet at the end of the game. A photo showed the time on the scoreboard as 8:40 p.m. and the words "WE WIN!" One of the fans in the photo was Sudac. Anderson pointed him out. And standing next to Sudac was a man with a grin on his face looking straight at the camera. The man wore a black baseball cap. The cap looked just like the cap that investigators found in the smashed silver Nissan.

The Man Driving the Ford

There were five people in the 1998 Ford Explorer that was hit.

Vinicio Jimenez said he was driving from his home in Tijuana to visit relatives in Los Angeles. He borrowed the Explorer from his brother. Jimenez's pregnant wife Yine was in the front passenger seat, and their five-year-old daughter Naomi was in the backseat with two relatives.

He was going about 55 miles an hour when he noticed lights coming up from behind. "All of a sudden they were very close. And they hit me," Jimenez said.

"He flung me against the little wall. And then my car started turning over."

Jimenez said the car that hit him became jammed under his vehicle. "He was in back of me, in the rear. He was stuck to me." He said the cars did not disengage until his Ford smashed into the center divider and began tumbling down the *continued on page 46*

How? Wait, tell me about it later, when you come over. Talk about 'modern family'...I love it! I can't wait to hear more."

"I know. It's crazy, right?"

I could hear the excitement in my friend's voice, and though part of me thought, *losing another friend to baby land*, the majority of me was full of pride and joy, as these were the emotions that were emanating from Eddie. "From Cabana Boy to Baby Daddy," I said. "Congratulations. Now get your hot ass over here so I can get the full scoop face-to-face."

The Clock Is Ticking

Perhaps it's because I'm in a bad mood today, or maybe it's because I've heard it one too many times this week, but regardless of the reason, I'm all in a huff over one particular phrase. It's one you know, one you've heard, likely from a parent or sibling. It's usually spoken in a familial context. It's not the phrase alone that bothers me, so much as all of the weight of its subtext and the guilt.

The phrase doesn't stand alone — it can't. It needs to be preceded by a certain premise: that there is someone elderly or ailing, and that someone is elsewhere. Someone with whom you are likely not close, but whose home your business or pleasure will soon bring you within the general vicinity of. It is only after these factors are in place that a family member will say, "Are you going to stop by and visit [said elderly or ailing person]?" And it is this question, which is followed by the phrase that is currently the focus of my menstrual-induced rage: "I mean, we're not sure how long he/she is going to be with us."

To which I think, but never say, *What does that matter*? You visit a person

because you *want* to, not because you're afraid they might die tomorrow and you'll have missed your chance to say whatever it is you've always yearned to say but never had the courage because you were convinced they'd still be around to judge you for it.

Who knows how much time any of us has? I could walk outside today, get hit by a car, and die on the spot. In fact, three people have died on the crosswalk in front of my building, so this is not as far-fetched as you might think. Sure, someone who is extremely elderly or ill has a greater chance of sleeping the final sleep. But is that what it takes to pull you out of your self-absorbed world and show a little kindness?

I spend time with people I love. Most of them are healthy. When those healthy loved ones of mine do fall ill, or elderly, I won't feel the guilt and weight of "rushing" to be the way I wish I'd been when they were well. Why wait until then? It seems downright stupid. So, know this, dear loved ones — if I care, I'm there. Now. In sickness or in health. And if I'm not there now, when you are well, don't expect me to knock on your door with apologies and excuses when you fall ill. Because if I'm anything, it's consistent.

Going Out on a High Note?

Family of Man Who Committed Suicide Using La Mesa Woman's "Exit Kit" Suing for "Pain and Suffering Caused by the Unintentionally Hilarious Death of a Loved One by Helium Inhalation"

"Remember meeeeeeeeee!" MANNING THE BALLOON MACHINE AT PARTY CITY IN EL CAJON — The saga of the Gruesome Grandma of Grossmont just took a turn for the blackly humorous, thanks to an unemployed technical writer and an Apple computer's built-in webcam.

First, a little background: La Mesa grandmother Sharlotte Hydorn was arrested in late May in connection with the death of 29-year-old Poway man Rick Krepeski after he purchased one of her homemade "exit kits" and used it to end his life. Hydorn, who sells the kits at \$60 a pop, is the sole member of GLADD (Glorious Life And Dignified Death), an organization dedicated to helping the terminally ill to see

themselves out of this world on their own terms. The kit consists of a plastic bag that seals around the neck and is equipped with a rubber tube that may be hooked up to a helium tank.

Straight helium is lethal after just a couple of minutes. Unfortunately, it's also hysterical after just a few seconds, and after deciding to commit suicide, Krepeski made the perhaps doubly regrettable decision to record his demise on his computer in a kind of video suicide note. When his horrified family viewed the video in an attempt to understand why their beloved son and brother would make this terrible decision (Krepeski was not terminally ill), they soon found themselves subjected to the nightmarish experience of howling with laughter at the death of a loved one.

"The past few years have been agony for me," began Krepeski, sounding not unlike Theodore from Alvin & the Chipmunks. "Ever since Diana broke up with me and I got laid off from work, I've been so depressed, and nothing seems to help. Whoa, dizzy."

"I'm so confused," confessed Krepeski's brother Mike. "I mean, if this were anybody else, I'd be slapping this up on YouTube and

STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

Hey, Matthew:

Is there any practical limit to how big passenger planes can get? They seem so huge now, I was just wondering if there's some top size that they can get to before they just can't fly. — Anonymous, San Diego

Yeah, the Airbus A380 can haul around a small town's worth of folks at its maximum configuration. Of course, the size limit might have more to do with how long it would take to get all those people through inspections to get on the plane in the first place. Start shuffling through the X-ray machine on Wednesday for a Friday flight. But,

actually, the state of physics being what it is today, there's no limit to the size of a flying object, assuming you can generate enough engine thrust to haul the beast off the ground and to stay aloft. But, you have to keep in mind the fact that weight increases by a cube of the length, width, or height of your new Pterodactyl

5000. If you double the size of the A380, weight would increase by a factor of eight. Perhaps you can specialize in transporting very thin people with few clothes to keep things under control.

What you need, obviously, is the strongest, lightest fuselage material you can find. The Airbus is 25 percent plastic. Comforting thought. It's aluminum (like most other planes) reinforced by quartz, carbon, or glass fibers and plastic laminates. Take-off weight is calculated at abut 650 tons and it cruises at about 560 miles per hour. It can take off on most runways that can accommodate a 747, so you don't have to enlarge your airport into the next county. Boeing's 787 is 80 percent plastic composite, but not as big as the Airbus. Part of your answer is the fact that nobody will pay huge sums for season floor seats to watch an anonymous immigrant pick lettuce. Beckham, Yao, and planeloads of athletes, performers, educators, tech specialists, biochemists, and other professional superstars can get past the *migra* easily with their O-1 visas. These are reserved for what the consular service calls "aliens of extraordi-

nary ability."

So, how do you prove you have extraordinary ability? You need some sort of "sustained national or international acclaim" and letters from peers stating what an extraordinary alien you really are. Cited often in the professional literature as an expert? Have a Nobel

Prize or two? Film and TV personalities need to show some "advanced achievement." Athletes

need a "level of expertise not possessed by others" and must have risen to the top of their professions. Beckham seems to qualify, but there's a lot of wiggle room in those descriptions. "Extraordinary ability," in reality, might mean being over seven feet tall or being a handsome, photogenic British bloke.

O-1s must have a guarantee of employment before they enter the U.S. (Nike, in the case of Yao), and the future employer handles the visa-application process. Once you have your papers, the consular service considers you a "temporary worker," not an "immigrant"; the visa says nothing about residency — just employment — and gives you no residentalien status. If eventually you get booted off the movie set or out of the locker room or genetics lab, your employer is supposed to buy you a one-way ticket back to Shanghai or Manchester or wherever you came from.

The consular service offers 11 different kinds of temporary-worker visas covering different situations. If you're a foreign employee of an extraordinary alien and your work is vital to keeping the alien extraordinary, then you get an O-2 visa. And in Beckham's case, the adorable Skeletal Spice might get an O-3 visa identifying her as the spouse of an extraordinary alien, but that wouldn't give her permission to work.

Reggie Bush received improper benefits at USC and last year made \$8,000,000 as a Saint.

e'll start with the University of Southern California (USC) bust. You remember the school criminals: O.J. Mayo (received improper benefits) played college basketball for one year, skipped to the NBA (Memphis Grizzlies), and made \$4,456,000 last season. Reggie Bush (received improper benefits) jumped to the NFL (New Orleans Saints) after his junior year, made \$8,000,000 in 2010. But, let's not gloss over the pain. These program-killing sanctions have profoundly wounded USC, to the extent that, according to USA Today, Trojans football only managed to sign a top-five national recruiting class this year. Hey, top-five is not number one. The pain of being somewhere in the top five and not number one can only be known by those who have endured it. And that's not you, Pilgrim.

Like any world-class bureaucracy, the NCAA excels at enforcing minute infractions while allowing members of the collegiate-industrial complex to plunder and pillage. Follows is a pop quiz entitled "Is This an NCAA Rules Violation?" beginning with one from Bill Lubinger of *The Plain Dealer* (Cleveland).

How do I keep from losing weekends like that? The answer was a small voice. "Ask someone normal," the voice said.

This would be a Friday night some weeks back, the most recent Friday the 13th, technically not a full moon but close enough for rock and roll. I was walking along C Street, downtown, past the Fish Joint, closed now for hours; it was around 11 p.m. I was unable to sleep — tossing, turning, thinking of Sartre and my own lingering alien-

ation (decades now) in my converted hotel room, which is a kind of real-life imitation of some artful movie-set flop house, lacking only a bare lightbulb suspended from the middle of the room, maybe a revolver on the cigarette-stained night stand with a half-full bottle of cheap bourbon, and a stuttering neon sign just outside the third-floor window: O-T-E-L.

I gave up trying to recall my once-memo-

rized chapters of Sartre's Troubled Sleep, threw on my raincoat, turned my collar to a wind that was not there, thrust my fists deep into the pockets, and followed my nose and the tomcat perfume of jacaranda along the trolley tracks. Stepping into a pub on Sixth, I stood in the doorway and scoped out the bar sprouting snap-brimmed hats hunched over shots and beers. A hostess leered wantonly at me (an uncanny resemblance to my mother) and extended a menu, asking, "How many are you, sir?"

"One," I told her, saying nothing of the legion of warring demons within me. In my trench-coat pocket, my fingers had closed around the empty prescription bottle for my antidepressants. It had been over a week now without them, which might explain why the O'Doul's she poured me looked like the excrescence of the post-industrial and electronic culture that suffocated me daily.

Leaving the faux beer unfinished, I quickly fled the establishment, stifling my existential nausea. On the street again, I wondered if downtown had gotten worse in the 30 years I've been here — or is it me? Are these unfortunates, these psychosocially dysfunctional souls hanging onto the edge of the planet with suction cups, just another version of themselves, avatars of the same stained and damned souls that populated these city blocks three decades ago? My nausea gave way to a light-headedness that threatened to overcome me on these Gaslamp streets.

I lifted the back of my right hand to my forehead, staving off, I hoped, yet another fainting spell. With my other hand, I signaled a passing taxi. Returning to my cell of a room, anemic with hopelessness, I clutched the thin blanket about me, lodged my thumb against my inner cheek and fled for three days into unkind dreams.

The following Tuesday brought relentless rain beneath a still somehow fullish moon visible occasionally between clouds. But I set out, recorder in hand, in search of hope and an answer to the question, How do I keep from losing weekends like that? The answer was a small voice yet with a majestic power suggesting God. Maybe not the God, but a god. "Ask someone normal," the voice said.

Jackie Fundak, 44, is having lunch in Little Italy



with her girlfriend Paula Kwast, 48. Both are from San Diego. Last weekend Jackie put the Fun back in Fundak by attending a horse show in Bonita. "If your daughter rides horses, you go to horse shows," she said. Fundak has no plans for the upcoming weekend as of yet but describes her ideal weekend as "a weekend in Bermuda. Did that four years ago and it was fun!"

Jackie F's companion nods. "A weekend

at the beach is her thing, all right. This weekend I'm helping to move my office, but ideally I'd be spending that time by the side of the pool, not running the kids around."

"Scuba-diving in Monterey," Sharif Ahmed, 28, tells me. "That's what I did last weekend." No plans as yet for next weekend. "Last year I saw my first shark, that was in the Bahamas. About eight feet, not too big. That would be my weekend all the time, if possible. Scuba-diving."

Bill Wells, 56, is a security guard with Elite Security. "Last weekend was great. I worked. Ideally, I'd be working every weekend; that's what I'm after, full-time work. I was passed over for that because of discrimination." Wells feels he was discriminated against as a Caucasian in favor of other ethnic groups. "But last weekend I worked the North Park Festival of Arts. I enjoyed that, just watching the people and meeting artists and musicians." Wells is a former long-distance trucker but does not miss it. "There's nothing fun about pulling into Detroit, dead of winter, two in the morning."

"Henna is usually part of joyful occasions," explained Wardah Halim of HennaTrendz in Chula Vista (858-366-3374; hennatrendz.com). "Marriages, birthdays, graduations, sweet 16s, bar mitzvahs."

A few of those occasions are in the Kelly family's near future, and I've always been fascinated with the flowing designs of henna art. That's why I was talking with Halim, who explained that henna is a plant.

"The scientific name is Lawsonia inermis. It grows in hot, humid climates: India, Pakistan, Yemen, India, Egypt, Morocco. The leaves of the plant are ground into a fine powder and then a paste is made out of that powder, using natural ingredients such as lemon juice and essential oils. The

paste is used to draw designs on the skin. It's a natural dye. It's temporary; it lasts anywhere from one to three weeks. Because it's staining the top few layers of skin cells, it will come off as your skin cells exfoliate.

"The final stain of henna comes out as a shade of brown — a burgundy brown, mahogany brown - but never black."

Halim cautioned about using what is called black henna. "Black henna is pphenylenediamine [PPD], which is used in artificial dye - it's not good for your skin."

Halim has been doing henna since she was 12. "I am a traditional girl. I do the floral traditional styles — Indian, Arabic, Hindu-like styles. I don't do creatures - dragons, birds, fish."

HennaTrendz prices for the design start at \$10 in her home studio. Parties start at \$70 an hour.

"I am from Pakistan," said Anita Bhakta of Hennasphere in Bay Park (858-220-6782; hennasphere.com). "In our culture, we have henna parties before any big event - weddings, religious occasions. I grew up going to these parties. The host would distribute henna cones, and everyone would try their hand at it. Usually there were only a handful of people at the party who felt comfortable doing it. Everyone would always be very willing to let me draw them, even when I was eight years old."

Bhakta specializes in Indian and Arabic styles of henna. "But if someone brings me an image, I can pretty much copy anything," she said. "For a bracelet, a flower, or an anklet, it only takes a couple minutes. If I was to do an Indian bride who wanted the traditional

amount of henna — both hands, front and back, the feet, up the ankles, and maybe even further up — it could take four to six hours. The more you practice doing your henna, the faster you get. For a half-hour appointment, someone can get quite a bit of henna done. So sometimes I say, 'Bring a friend, because if you are just wanting something going up your arm, I can do that in 15 minutes.'

Bhakta charges \$75 an hour, with a twohour minimum, and a travel fee for more than ten miles. Her home studio rates are \$60 for a half hour, with no time minimum.

"I do quite a few pregnant bellies, which is a fun addition to a baby shower," said Natasha Papousek of Crescent Moon Designs Henna Art in Lemon Grove (619-337-5780; cmoondesigns.com). "I also get quite a few people just wanting to do something special to show off in the summer. I had one

guy who was going to an event in San Francisco, and he wanted something really wild, so I did his whole chest and back and down the arms." Papousek charges \$75 an hour to come to a client. In the studio, she averages about \$10-\$15 per appointment. If a client is having henna done for an event, she recommends scheduling the appoint-

ment two days before the event in order for the henna to come to its full color.

"I get calls from clients that want to get henna done because they want to get a permanent tattoo," said Tejal Shah of Henna San Diego in Rancho Peñasquitos (858-752-3628; hennasandiego.com). "The client tries it out first in henna."

Shah charges \$65-\$100 an hour. No travel fee for up to 25 miles. Individual appointments at the studio are \$5 and up. (Ten percent off when you mention that you saw Henna in the Reader!)

MIKE ELLIOTT'S FATHER DISAPPEARED WHEN HE WAS 13 YEARS OLD.

Not disappeared as in vanished mysteriously. Disappeared as in left and never came back. Some 27 years later, on a rainy afternoon, Mike drove through Pinellas County, Florida (1100 miles from his hometown of Bayonne, New Jersey), in search of an address that might or might not belong to his father. He vacillated between hope and fear that whoever answered the door would be the man he was looking for. He decided that, if it was his father, he would give him a good "F**k you" and maybe a quick, hard fist to the jaw.

"As I'm driving," Mike tells me from the safe distance of 13 years, "I'm trying to find this place, and the thing that sticks in my mind is that my father would be living in a good area. I remember his selfishness. So as I drove through these trashy little towns and trailer parks, I said, 'He's not going to be here.' And then, sure enough, I pass the last big road, and then it becomes a really beautiful area. As soon

as I saw all the beautiful palm trees and the nice houses, I said, 'Aw, shit.""

Mike sits at the edge of a cream-colored leather loveseat in a clean, light room with wooden floors. The decoration is sparse. On an end table, ice melts at the bottom of a blue highball glass that he filled with Tanqueray a half hour ago. "To loosen me up," he'd said as he poured.

To fully appreciate that particular moment in Mike's story, the one where he's driving down an unfamiliar road, looking for an address he doesn't want to find, it's important to get to know Mike.

The 53-year-old business systems analyst rides a grumbling Softail Deluxe Harley that awakens his neighbors at 6:00 a.m. Yes, he's apologetic about the early morning noise, but still, he's *that* guy.

Then there's his chest-up, tough-guy walk, and his heavy brow. Everything most obvious about him suggests that he'd have a grittier interior design aesthetic than the Zenlike sanctuary of this City Heights condo. Potted plants stand in every they'll have homemade chicken soup for dinner. For now, however, it's Tanqueray on ice, and maybe a few sips of the Fat Tire on the end table next to his glass.

Mike is perched at the edge of the loveseat, but a half-hour ago, when this story began, he was sitting back with his legs splayed, as if the particulars he was sharing were of little consequence. Outside, a rare San Diego storm was beginning to brew. He'd already pulled the plants off the balcony, bringing them inside to protect them from a wind that was whipping up the trees in the canvon behind the condo.

"In my town, fathers gravitated toward the bars," he said. "That's what we were famous for in Bayonne. A bar on every corner. We were all in the same boat. All the fathers were either missing in action or they lived at home and were drunks. I remember my friends' fathers coming down the block and stumbling off the sidewalk, drunk out of their minds. To us, if you had one, it was, like, 'Who cares?' A father wasn't something to respect."

As Mike shared tales

of his father's comings and goings throughout his childhood years, his tone of resignation and slumped posture gave me a glimpse into the kid he once was, and the attitude he'd had to adopt. Even good memories are tinged with disappointment.

"They had just started a Little League team in our town," he said, beginning the story of his "best memory" of his father. "This was back in the early- to mid-'60s. They had basic tryouts. Then somebody would contact you, give you your uniform, and you'd show up. My father took me to my first game. Brand new Little League field. Brand new Little League gear. The coach had never seen any of the kids, so he had no idea who could play what. He puts me at catcher, and my number was ten."

He raised a hand to demonstrate the way a catcher would hold up his mitt.

"I'm sitting there, catching, and the ball kept hitting my glove and falling out because I wasn't strong enough to close the glove. And I made a couple of mistakes on the field.... Anyhow, long story short, we're on the way home on the bus, and I swear to you, my father says to me, 'Who was that catcher?' And I said, 'What do you mean?' He said, 'That catcher stunk.' And I said, 'What catcher?' and he said, 'Number ten.' I said, 'I'm number ten."

Mike shook his head and reached for his drink.

"He didn't even know that was me. The best part [of the day] was that he had come with me. The second part is

that he also bought me one of those little Italian ices. That's the only time I ever remember him giving me something."

Then there was the time his father came around to show off a new car.

"Guess what kind it was," Mike prodded. When I couldn't, he said, "An MG Midget." He paused for effect, then looked with incredulity over the rim of his high-

ball glass. "He's got five kids. It's a two-seater." Mike wasn't the kind of kid who asked questions. He didn't know where his father spent his time, only that he wasn't around much, and that when he was, he and Mike's mother often fought about money. His mother was always asking for some.

"It wasn't for her. It was for milk and food. [We were] five kids living in the projects," he said of himself, his three brothers — one older, two younger — and his baby sister.

Eventually, Mike's mother took his father to court to force him to pay child support. Mike was eight or nine at the

When Mike was 13 or 14, his father reached out to the family and invited the kids to south Jersey for Thanksgiving. His mom said, "Whoever wants to go can go." By then, Mike's oldest brother had established himself as Mom's loyal protector and refused to go. He hated their father "like he was the devil," and Mike's sister "couldn't be bothered." A couple of weeks later, his father called again and asked if the kids could come back for Christmas. This time, his mother said no.

"She blew up about it. She figured, 'You took three of my kids for Thanksgiving, and now you want to take them for Christmas, too? You haven't been around forever.' I just remember she had a huge fight with him over the phone. The next thing I knew, he dropped off some gifts for us, and that was the day he disappeared."

This time, Boobie disappeared for decades. "While he was gone,

he was gone. There was no change from what it was before. So, big deal. We were all mad as hell at him. To be honest, I think if he had come around when we were in those late-teenage, early-20s, early-30s years, he would have gotten his

At one point, Mike's grandmother let it slip that his father might be in Florida, but by then, Mike and his brothers and sister had written Boobie off. As far as

and listened for "anything that would foul him up, anything that would suggest he was just bullshitting me. I didn't see anything."

But hearing sincerity in his father's voice wasn't the most satisfying part of the visit. "The most satisfaction I got out of the whole thing was telling him that my mother was able to raise us — and do a good job of it — without him."

After they left the bar, Mike dropped his father back at his house and asked if he could take a picture. Boobie let him and even smiled. Mike could tell it was forced, but he wasn't going to let his father's discomfort keep him from snapping the photograph.

"That was my evidence that the whole thing happened." He still has the picture somewhere in his garage.

Then Mike left. Though his father had cried several times that afternoon, Mike stayed dry-eyed until he drove away.

"I got behind the wheel, and as soon as I got to the corner, I lost it. I mean, I fell apart. I was driving and bawling my eyes out."

It occurs to Mike that he's left out two important facts. One, Boobie asked for everyone's Social Security numbers, so he could put them on his life insurance. Mike tells me this as if in passing, then describes his older brother's reaction to the visit and the request ("That son of a bitch! He'll never be a part of my life!"), his sister's indifference, and his younger brothers' curiosity and excitement. Then he tacks on the second important fact.

"Oh, yeah." He reaches for the blue glass. He puts it back down when he finds it empty. "I guess I probably should have mentioned that he had slowmoving leukemia that he was fighting at the time."

After Mike's trip to Florida, the only other contact he had with his father was an occasional email. Three years later,

Boobie died. Although he'd already signed the house over to Valerie, he left everything else to Mike's mom (whom he'd never divorced) and their five children.

The six of them received about \$14,000 each.

On the phone several days after our conversation, Mike says, "Hey, I forgot to tell you. You know the money I inherited? The \$14,000? I used it to buy my Harley." He laughs.

ble digits, although recent local joblessness has slipped a bit below double digits. American housing values are down about 30 percent from their 2006 peak. San Diego is down 38 percent from its 2005 peak to a median \$321,000, which is still high by comparison with other metro areas. The Pacific region consumer mood surveys are slightly below the nation's, according to San Diego Workforce Partnership.

San Diego tourism is picking up, but it trails other major California metro areas. For the year to date, the local hotel occupancy rate is 65.9 percent, up from 63.3 for the same period last year. But San Francisco's rate this year is 71.6 percent, Orange County's is 68.3, and Los Angeles's 69.8, according to Smith Travel Research. "It is important to remember in comparing cities that Los Angeles, San Francisco,

and [Orange County] are international destinations," says La Jolla tourism guru Jerry Morrison. The weak dollar is helping those markets more than it helps San Diego. Many downtown hotels remain underwater. The posh Sè San Diego was recently sold out of bankruptcy for one-third of its original cost.

Through the years, San Diego household income has grown at 2 percent a year. In both 2009 and 2010, it fell by 2 percent. "[Yearly] incomes could drop further — not 2 percent but maybe 1 percent," says Marney Cox, chief economist of San Diego Association of Governments. Employment will only go up half of 1 percent this year, and housing prices have another 5 to 10 percent to fall, he feels. "It will take another five years to get the jobs back that we lost in the recession."

San Diego retail sales were up 8 percent from July of last year through March of this year, but that was greatly as a result of higher gas prices, says Cox. "People are not consuming; the savings rate remains high," he says. "There is way too much commercial space. We have to figure out what to do with the excess retail space. Strip malls are going to have way too much space."

Kelly Cunningham, economist for the National University System Institute for Policy Research, notes that San Diego County retail sales peaked at \$47.8 billion in 2006, and the estimate for 2010 is \$40.7 billion. He thinks it will be 2021 before local retail sales get back to

their 2006 levels, adjusted for inflation. "It's astonishing," says Cunningham. "We used to have population growth of 50,000 a year. Now it's 30,000, or less than 1 percent, annually." Babies keep getting born, and births outnumber deaths. "But for the last several years we have had an exodus of residents."

In theory, shoppers are supposed to pay tax on internet sales, but that is not a reliable expectation. Beset by reluctant consumers who check the internet before continued on page 46

Another driver on the freeway that night, Timothy Ricker, said that when he came upon the crash, he parked so his headlights lit up the cars. The cars were near each other and alongside the center divider, the Nissan upright, the Ford lying on the passenger side. Ricker said he climbed up onto the Ford to look through a window, taking care to avoid a front tire spinning wildly in the air. He tried to open a door. "It was crunched closed," he said, so he climbed through a window down inside, where he found a woman. He saw that part of her body was trapped under the vehicle.

Ricker and four Marines who had stopped — Solomon Huss, Thomas Harley, Sean Wax, and Zach Thomas pushed the Explorer back onto its wheels to free the woman.

As the vehicle was righted, the woman fell through a window onto the pavement.

Jimenez said, "When they lifted the car, my wife was just lying there." She was bleeding from her head. His wife was six months pregnant.

No one could find a pulse on 24-year-old Yine Erandy Gonzalez Angeles. She was declared dead later at Scripps Memorial Hospital La Jolla. The medical team performed a Caesarean section to try to save the baby. The death of Baby Girl Gonzalez Angeles was declared at 1:55 a.m. by the county medical examiner. Jimenez was a widower at 26 years of age.

pulled him out. After the man regained consciousness, he stood next to Sudac on the side of the freeway.

Walking Away

Traffic began to back up behind the crash immediately. One witness stuck in the traffic jam told authorities he saw two men walking away on the shoulder of the road, headed south toward the Lomas Santa Fe exit. He said one man was wearing a blue Charger jersey and "One was on the cell phone."

Records showed Sudac's cell phone called his wife's cell phone starting at 1:03 a.m. that night. Sudac made four more calls to her in quick succession, the last one at 1:14 a.m. His wife's cell phone called him back at 1:05 a.m. and 1:09 a.m.

In court, prosecutor Natalie Villaflor said that Sudac's wife came to pick him up in a blue Dodge pickup truck. The truck, registered in her father's name, had blood spots on the passenger's seat when investigators looked at it later. DNA from the five blood spots matched Sudac's DNA.

DNA tests showed that the blood on the driver's airbag in the Nissan belonged to Sudac.

Witnesses said that from where Sudac and his companion stood on the side of the freeway, they had a clear, unobstructed view of Yine, who lay facedown near the trunk of their car. Blood from her head ran under the Nissan. This was shown in many of the crime scene photos displayed in court.

Huss reported hearing Sudac yell into his cell phone before he disappeared, "There's been a terrible accident. I need you to come pick

Bad Memories All Around

Investigators found an address for John Francis Sudac Senior.

The elder Sudac told highway patrol officers that he did not know where his son lived, he did not know his son's whereabouts that night, and he did not know his son's cell phone number.

The lead investigator, Patrick Holt, said of the senior Sudac, "He was polite" and "He did not provide us any information."

Highway patrol officer Michael Bush was more blunt, describing Sudac Sr. as

"basically useless." Bush said they contacted Sudac Sr. at about 3:45 a.m., almost three hours after the crash.

Cell phone records showed that the phone belonging to Sudac Sr. called his son's cell phone three times that morning, at 3:18 a.m., 3:20 a.m., and 3:26 a.m., according to a Verizon Wireless analyst who testified.

Sudac Jr., accompanied by a defense attorney, turned himself in at 6:45 p.m. on January 4. Eighteen hours after the collision, his blood was taken, and the analysis showed no alcohol or drugs in his system at that time. Sudac was taken into custody. He posted \$200,000 bail the next day.

The second man in the Nissan went unidentified for more than two years, until this March, one month before Sudac went on trial for hitand-run manslaughter. The Man in the Passenger Seat

At a preliminary hearing in January 2009, it appeared that defense attorney Herb Weston would build a defense based on the fact that the second person in the Nissan had not been identified and therefore reasonable doubt could be created as to who was driving the car.

But investigators had found shredded Charger tickets in Sudac's apartment. In the ensuing months, they pieced the tickets together, and lead investigator Holt got a search warrant to obtain information about season ticketholders who sat near Sudac. When Holt found Sara Anderson, eventually she showed him the picture of Sudac and the man in the black cap. Jimenez could not remember Sudac drinking that afternoon, during the game, or after the game. "I didn't see him drinking." What time did they leave the parking lot that night? "I'm not sure." Where did you all go for dinner that night, after the game? "I can't remember."

In sworn testimony during trial, Jimenez said that Sudac drove the Nissan as they headed for home after midnight. Do you remember the car crash? "No, I don't." You don't remember the Nissan hitting the Ford? "I don't remember anything from that car accident," Jimenez said in the witness box. "I believe I was knocked unconscious." Do you remember walking away from the crash scene on the shoulder of the highway? "I don't remember anything." Prosecutor Villaflor demanded to know the next thing that he did remember. "Pretty much, I remember waking up at John's house,"

Jimenez said. "My girlfriend, she came, picked me up from John's house."

So how did he learn that he had been in a car crash? Jimenez said it was Sudac's wife Alexia who told him, "There was an accident with another vehicle." Jimenez said days later he learned that a woman died in the crash. Didn't he know police were looking for him, the other person who was in the Nissan? "Yeah, I heard about that," Jimenez admitted. But he never tried to contact investigators because he said his pal Sudac "did the right thing" by turning himself in. Jimenez decided there was "not much more to say about

Jimenez said that he is on probation for possession of marijuana for sale. Investigators had recovered from the Nissan a plastic bag holding 4.7 grams of marijuana. Jimenez said the bag did not belong to him and he hadn't given it to Sudac.

The Defense

During the trial, defense attorney Herb Weston suggested that the driver of the Ford fell asleep or was "inattentive" or that "for whatever reason" he was the one who lost control of his vehicle and smashed into the center divider. Weston proposed that it was the Ford that careened back out into lanes and caused a collision with the Nissan driven by Sudac. The defense attorney vigorously questioned highway patrol investigators. Weston said there were no fragments of broken taillights photographed where the investigators claimed the collision occurred.

Weston suggested that statements made by the driver of the Ford were too influential on investigators. "Maybe your theory is wrong," he suggested to officers who testified.

Investigators said that the trailer hitch on the back of the Ford had made an obvious indentation in the Nissan, visible in photos taken of the

front of the Nissan. Investigators documented the tire marks, which progressed for hundreds of yards down the freeway, climbing up onto the center divider and then back down onto the pavement in more than one place.

Weston called to the stand his own forensic expert and traffic accident reconstructionist, Stephen Plourd, who found fault with the highway patrol's investigation and conclusions.

Guilty

Sudac turned 30 years old on April 20, 2011, a day when the jury was being selected.

The seven men and five women heard evidence for two weeks from more than 30 witnesses. They deliberated a full day before finding Sudac guilty of felony vehicular manslaughter and felony hit-and-run causing death.

Sudac had been free on bail, but on May 5, the day of the verdict, he was taken into custody.

Naomi, the daughter of the woman who was crushed to death, turned eight years old this month. On September 9, John Francis Sudac Jr. will be sentenced. He could get a maximum of 11 years in state prison, but he is eligible for good-conduct credits and could serve only half his sentence, according to the prosecutor. Villaflor said, "I'm pleased that the jury reached a just verdict and Sudac is being held accountable for what he did. But it's never going to bring back Yine Gonzalez and her baby."

Judge Runston Maino said at an earlier hearing, "Just for the record, I have heard some evidence that the woman who died was pregnant, and that appears to be six months pregnant. That, of course, means that you have another potential victim there. But whether the DA charges it is not up to me, but it's there if you want to."

The district attorney's office did not bring charges for the unlawful killing of the unborn baby. ■

Niems said sales from his Escondido stores have "steadily declined" since the recent enforcement: he estimated a loss of "\$28,000 in revenue" since he was told to take down his feather flags three months ago.

"Although there is no specific language about feather flags, code enforcement has decided they are not allowed even if you have a permit," he said, contending that his loss in revenue translates to a loss of tax earnings for the city.

The business owner proposed that Escondido allow a permit for one feather banner per business.

If You Were Parents

San Diego County Board of Supervisors Accused of **Neglecting Social Services** Downtown — About 40 people attended the June 7 San Diego County Board of Supervisors' public hearing on the 2011-2012 budget.

Participants at the 2 p.m. session urged supervisors to fund social services, salaries, and staffing.

Connie Soucy of Access to Independence spoke about a 78-year-old woman diagnosed with Alzheimer's. The county denied in-home supportive services because the woman didn't have Medi-Cal. Although she met the income requirement, her MediCal application had been denied, according to Soucy.

She then cited a report stating the county enrolls less than 50 percent of people eligible for MediCal. She said the county's failure to enroll food-stamp applicants resulted in \$106 million in unclaimed state and federal

funds in 2008.

Laurie Macrae of the National Alliance on Mental Illness said the state was shifting responsibility for providing mental health services to counties. Discussing that responsibility "should be part of the budget process," said Macrae, adding, "I am the mother of a man with a mental illness."

Patricia Gonzales of the Lemon Grove Family **Resource Center said staff**ing falls short of increased applications for public assistance. The board will accept written comment on the budget until June 15.

Sweetwater Union High School District Money Trail **Gets Longer**

Chula Vista — In a recent interview, Bertha Lopez voiced a strong opinion about Sweetwater Union **High School district attor**ney Bonifacio Garcia. Lopez, who has been a Sweetwater boardmember since 2008 and served as a Chula Vista boardmember for ten years before that, said she did not trust the advice offered by the attorney. Why not?

Garcia recently advised the board to hire attorney Greg Vega to do an independent review of district expenditures. According to Lopez. Garcia did not reveal that Vega had worked for the district. A Union-Tribune story also reported that Vega reviewed Garcia's employment contract last July.

Citizens for Good Government in the South Bay was a political action committee that operated out of Garcia's office until March, when it became inactive. Yuri Calderon. a member of Garcia's law firm, was the treasurer. Garcia gave generously to this committee, as did Laura Martinez, who co-owns a house with Garcia in Sierra Madre, California, according to documents.

According to records kept by the San Diego CITY LIGHTS

County Registrar of Voters, Jim Cartmill, a Sweetwater boardmember since 1996. received \$5000 from the Citizens for Good Government in South Bay in last November's election. He also received \$5000 from Laura Martinez, Arlie Ricasa, first elected in 1998 and reelected last November, received \$5000 from Laura Martinez. And newly elected John McCann received \$900 from Laura Martinez.

When I was looking for a partner/lover/lifemate I spent a bit of time researching. One fact stood out above all others. At that time (and according to previous decades census data I looked up, BEFORE the internet), San Diego has a skewed male vs female ratio, way heavy on the male side, in every datable age group under 65. It had the highest imbalance of any city in the US, at that time. In fact, there was NO city in the US with a similar high female vs male ratio. Closest was Pittsburg. And don't blame the military. I think the census counts military members in their home district. That just makes it worse.

"Warning! Do not attempt to hike to the canyon rim and back in one day!'

The Grand Canyon: Phantom Ranch By Joe Tuborg

The hardest part about visiting Phantom Ranch isn't getting there, but getting back. There are no welcome signs, no strategically placed words of encouragement. In fact, it's just the opposite. The only sign we saw was ominous at best — it didn't so much state its message as it shouted it:

"WARNING! Do not attempt to hike from the canyon rim to the river and back in one day! Each year hikers suffer serious injury or death from exhaustion." If you dared to pass, then you acknowledged the risk.

With most risk comes reward, and the Grand Canyon does not disappoint. There are many trails down to Phantom Ranch, but we chose the shortest and steepest, South Kaibab Trail. We started down before daybreak and were rewarded for our early entry by dawn's artistic light show. The morning sun splashed a multitude of colors against the sandstone rocks and formations, making the nighttime shadows melt away amid an ever-changing wheel of color.

The hike was hard. It was dirty, dusty, and jarring. Halfway down, we were almost run over by a young mountain goat that came sprinting over a rocky outcrop. It was a danger we had not anticipated, yet the moment passed so fast, one had to question if it really happened. I believe the animal was more surprised than we were.

South Kaibab initially starts down with gentle meandering curves, which are replaced with more severe snake-like switchbacks as you near the river. The trail was desolate and almost abandoned except for a couple of other fellow hikers and a team of ten mules lined up singlefile, hauling out tourists from the depths

of the canyon.

At the bottom of the trail is a bridge that leads into a tunnel with a small hobbit-like opening. After several yards of cooled darkness you emerge on a bridge spanning the Colorado River. It is gentle and beautiful here, unlike the heaving rapids one encounters downstream.

Past the bridge lies Phantom Ranch. Of the five million people who visit the Grand Canyon every year, only 1 percent make it to the ranch. The degree of difficulty, the discouragement, and the almost impossibility of booking a room or campsite dissuades all but the most determined from reaching this remote destination.

At first you come to the mule corrals; a small stream separates them from the human campground. Further ahead, the restaurant and cabins appear.

The word rustic is kind. Other than the national park's roofed shelters, the structures are old, with the restaurant constructed primarily of rock and mortar. Inside, wooden floors support picnic tables and a small kitchen. Food and drink are expensive, the furniture uncomfortable. Were it not for the fatigue of the hike, it would not be a place to loiter. Like the canyon itself, the ranch is not a soft place.

We chose to return to the rim of the canyon via the Bright Angel Trail. It's almost three miles longer than our descent, but with a gentler incline. (All things being relative, as ten miles of uphill climbing awaited.) As we pushed off, the phrase "Between a rock and a hard place" seemed apropos.

IMPERIAL BEACH WALK Looking for secluded beach? Try the one just south of Imperial Beach.

Distance from downtown San Diego: 14 miles **Hiking length:** 1.6 miles round trip • **Difficulty:** Easy



mperial Beach's beaches are not as glamorous as others farther north, but they do include some very secluded stretches of sand, including the one described here, lying within the Tijuana Slough National Wildlife Refuge. To get there, drive to the south end of Imperial Beach's Seacoast

Drive, where hopefully you can

find a parking space nearby. At the street's dead end, a planked walkway and interpretive plaques off to the left introduce you to the green tidal marshlands of the Ti-

juana River Estuary to the east. All of that is part of a four-square-mile tideland expanse managed by various national, state, and local agencies. This is one of Southern California's most important coastal wetland areas simply because it has been mostly spared from commercial and housing developments. The area is a recognized haven for birds. More than 400 species have been logged here so far, which is no surprise since the estuary is a key stopover on the Pacific Flyway - the equivalent of Interstate 5 for bird-migration traffic. The marsh's endangered inhabitants include the light-footed clapper rail and the California least tern. Visiting birds include ospreys, golden eagles, and peregrine falcons. The beach walk itself begins

with a little hop over rocks to the sandy beach. Modern houses and condominiums line the sandy strip to the north, and absolutely nothing in the way of buildings lies south, the direction you travel. Artificial dunes back up the beach to the left — they're closed to protect nesting terns. Depending on the level of the tide, you could be edging close alongside those dunes or enjoying a wide, glassy smooth expanse of wet sand, dimpled with rounded pebbles here and there. Low tide is definitely better. At 0.8 mile from then start, you

reach the mouth of the Tijuana River, which drains a substantial area of both Baja California (twothirds of the river's drainage area, including the city of Tijuana) and San Diego County (one-third of the river's drainage area). When storm runoff courses down the river, it's fascinating to watch the outrushing turbid freshwater mixing with the incoming blue-green ocean waves. In winter, gulls set up shop here, feeding in the water and wheeling overhead in great flocks.

The water quality of the Tijuana River is of variable and often dubious quality, so it's not a great idea to wade or swim in the river mouth area. Most swimmers and surfers tend to hang out near the Imperial Beach Pier, a mile north of the starting point, where the beach is lifeguarded during the warmer months, and the ocean water quality is better. The nearest drinking water and public restrooms are also located near that pier.

Summer Solstice, the time when the sun reaches its northernmost point in the sky, occurs this year at 10:16 a.m. on Tuesday, June 21. The summer solstice not only marks the beginning of summer for the Northern Hemisphere; it also means that the daylight hours are maximized. San Diegans now enjoy approximately 14 hours of daylight, in contrast to the meager 10 hours or so we experience in December. Anytime this week or next, try checking your shadow at 12:50 p.m. (the local daylight time in San Diego currently equivalent to astronomical noon). The sun is then only 10 degrees south of the

straight-up direction and casts near-vertical shadows. A lesserknown consequence of the summer solstice is that our twilight periods are longer than usual. Evening and morning twilight periods are now lasting more than 90 minutes.

Grunion Runs are predicted to occur during the late-evening hours (generally after 10 p.m. and before 1 a.m.), following the nocturnal high tide, June 15 though June 18. The small, silvery grunion tend to spawn on wide, gently sloping beaches such as Silver Strand, Mission Beach, Pacific Beach, La Jolla Shores, and Del Mar. Open season for grunion starts in June, and from then until the end of summer, the fish can be collected in reasonable numbers using the hands only (fishing licence needed for persons 16 years of age and older). For more information, visit dfg.ca.gov/ marine/grunionschedule.asp.

The Chirping of Crickets tells us the warmer weather of summer is well on its way. Their plaintive pleadings for mates are heard wherever bits of semi-natural scenery cut across the urban tapestry of San Diego. Try the Spruce Street suspension footbridge, west of Balboa Park between Front and Brant streets. From the swaying deck of the 70-foot-high bridge you can admire a canyon filled with green and gold grasses, nasturtiums, and eucalyptus, pepper, and palm trees. Sound effects begin by midafternoon

Buckwheat, a late-bloomer among native plants in our region, is show-

ing off its small, inconspicuous clusters of cream-colored flowers this month. Several kinds of buckwheat, found in dry, sunny locations throughout San Diego County, are the source of the "wild buckwheat" honey sold locally. Near the coast look for flat-top buckwheat, common on south-facing slopes. Here it shares space with other low-growing shrubs of the sage-scrub plant community like black sage and California sagebrush

Boëthius

"Wherefore I much marvel why these things are thus turned upside down, and the punishment of wickedness oppresses the good, while evil men obtain the rewards of the good. And I desire to know of thee what may seem to be the reason of so unjust confusion. For I would marvel less if I thought that all things were disordered by casual events. Now God being the governor, my astonishment is increased. For since that He distributeth oftentimes that which is pleasant to the good, and that which is distasteful to the bad, and contrariwise adversity to the good and prosperity to the evil, unless we find out the cause hereof, what difference may there seem to be betwixt this and accidental chance?" "It is no marvel," quote [Lady Philosophy], "if anything be thought temerarious and confused, when we know not the order it hath. But although thou beest ignorant of the causes why things be so disposed, yet because the world hath a governor, doubt not but all things are well done." — from *The Consolation of Philosophy*, book IV, part v (trans. Anton Pegis).

Anicius Manlius Severinus Boëthius (ca.480–524) was a Christian writer born in Rome to a family which claimed emperors and noblemen in its pedigree. After being made consul of the kingdom of the Ostrogoths in 510, he was jailed and eventually executed by King Theodoric for his suspected role in a conspiracy against the throne. While awaiting his death, Boëthius penned The Consolation of Philosophy, an attempt to find peace of mind through a philosophical examination of life and death. The book was one of the major influences on Medieval thought and helped to shape the Western approach to theology and Christian philosophy.

Welder at Work

Loose air-maze bundles of looping steel cables bespeak Smith's lifelong conviction that sculpture is "drawing in space."

ome clichés smell okay, others stink. King or Whenever I hear a California enthusiast hyperventilating about how the West as "a ma Coast is culturally "cutting edge" and so "out there," I remember that the last time David Smith (the most important and grandest

20th-century American sculptor) had a major exhibition in California was in Los Angeles in 1965. It wasn't planned as a memorial exhibition, but that's what it became when Smith died in a car accident earlier that year. He was 51 years old.

If you go East this summer, drive northwest from New York City into the Hudson Highlands to Storm King Center, a smallish museum set among 500 acres landmarked by works by Alexander Calder, Mark di Suvero, and other major sculptors of the past hundred years. It's not so much a sculpture garden as a sculpture estate, and the estate is owned, so to speak, by 13 works by David Smith. To see these in the open air, in varied weathers, is to see them more or less as Smith himself did in the fields outside his workshop in Bolton Landing, way north of Storm King on the western shore of Lake George. Hilton Kramer years ago described Bolton Landing

as "a machine shop in a landscape," which nails the mechanical-bucolic quality of some of Smith's work. As a kid, he was either playing around railyards and factories or fields

and creeks. If you're not going East, consider a pilgrimage to *David Smith: Cubes and Anarchy*, a thrilling selection of Smith's sculptures, paintings, and drawings currently at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Anybody with a passion for the sculptural imagination will want to see this exhibition.

That includes machinists (if there are any left), metalworkers, inventors, and mechanical engineers. Smith grew up middle class — his father was an engineer-inventor, his great-grandfather a blacksmith — but during a summer job following his first and only year of college, he learned to solder and spot-weld at a Studebaker factory and would later say that his geometric, non-representational forms owed everything to "gears, crossmembers, and brackets." As his

welding skills developed, so did his political affinity for the workingmen who were his first teachers. (First teasers, too: his coworkers, oldstyle beer-and-shot guys, made quick work of the wispy, bohemian goatee Smith sported on the job.) For the rest of his life, Smith identified himself as a blue-collar artist (he called Bolton Landing "Terminal Iron Works") and unrepentant leftie, and he produced a body of work unequaled for its industrial-pastoral lyricism.

The LACMA exhibition is a generous sampler that walks us through virtually every







stage of Smith's development, beginning at the end, with the austerely enchanting stainless-steel cubes, slabs, and cylinders of the Cubi series, their surfaces burnished with the whorling, sliding, serpentine sweeps of a circular sander, back through the *Zig* and Tanktotem works of the 1950s and early 1960s, then to the earlier work where we see Smith's furious curiosity about sculpture's possibilities, from small-scaled, reductive, purely abstract "constructions" to ascetic vertical humanesque works (like the 1954 Sitting Printer, whose torso is a type-case) and loose air-maze bundles of looping steel cables that bespeak Smith's lifelong conviction that sculpture is "drawing in space." The only things I miss are the chunky, hefty ode-to-machine-shop pieces of the 1950s that utilize gigantic wrenches, gears,

pliers, scrap, gears, connecting rods, and just about anything else Smith found that he could absorb into his form vocabulary.

Smith was born in Indiana (the Studebaker plant was in South Bend) in 1906 and by 1923 was in New York, where he studied painting and drawing at the Art Students League. During the New York years, he was exposed to Cubism and Russian Constructivism and experimented with punching a third, relief-like dimension into his paintings. He was also soaking up progressive politics, when one could still speak of a proletariat and a workers' revolution. It was during this period that Smith learned what he called "cubes and anarchy," and he would go on to make art that compounded an exquisite cubist-abstractionist sensibility with the energy and robustness of heavy-duty materials. No artist's originality is original. Smith was quick to declare the critical influence

doorway of his Bolton Landing workshop — they look like titanic greeters to the shop's magisterial contents, or like lookouts overseeing the nature that empowered Smith's imagination. Some of the photos are giveaways: one, of a ship's steam stacks, winches, ropes, and pipe railings, is a formal index to Smith's work; and a Bolton Landing photo of vigilant "sentinels" (trimmed and capped and footed by snow) standing next to a birch tree perfectly expresses how the imagination models from nature, in however abstract a manner, then restores an intensified nature, transformed, to our lives. Seeing Smith's works in their proper places - the wild places of studio and the natural world — makes me think that he wanted to find fresh, adamic ways of greeting the world, formally and politically. Even in a museum setting, you can sense how one man's imagination takes what history and the reality of his moment give him and turns it into a passion for existence and the work of existence.

The exhibition concludes with drawings and paintings. The drawings are a formal laboratory, and it's no surprise that many have a celebratory, sexualized energy. We also see the continuity between his flat paintings and the geometric fields of paint he applied to a lot of his sculptures. Some of the pictures are made with automobile enamel spray paint. The aerated, gaseous compositions recall one of his formative models, Kandinsky, who in the 1920s and 1930s made atomizer-spray drawings, but they also remind me that one technique used by the artists who decorated cave walls at Chauvet 32,000 years ago was to blow pigment through tubes of hollowed animal bone or their own cupped hands. Smith's work arcs between such prehistoric ceremonialism (or decoration: the jury's still out on that) and modern manufacturing. Every piece in Smith's Tanktotem series incorporates a boiler-tank drumhead, and the "totem" component expresses communal animism. The ravishing surprise of

the exhibition for me is the way the sanded surfaces of the Cubi's solid stainless-steel blocks and logs teem with actions of light. The gallery illumination creates ripples, runners, and flashings that seem to move inside the steel, as if a hidden life is being briefly,

uncannily exposed. The whorls and jags where the sander has "drawn" on the steel become, as you move around the work, cascading necklaces of pearly light, boas and ribbons and chevrons and wings that won't stay still. They give mass an unearthly transparency. Smith gets it all, both the gravity and the lightness of being. ■

"Bold Expressions" More than 50 quilts made in the American South between 1910 and the 1970s are showcased in exhibition of "African American Ouilts from the Collection of Corrine Riley," on display through Sunday, November 6. Many of the quilts are made from materials that were readily available to the makers, including flour sacks, old blue jeans, work clothes, fabric remnants. Tenured Trucks

On bright, sunny, San Diego days, I often crave a crisp, Ensenada-style fish taco. With apologies to Ralph Rubio — and the popular bar-and-grill that tops their fish tacos with a concoction that includes ranch dressing — the first places that come to mind are the *loncheras* (food trucks) serving up *mariscos* (seafood) around San Diego

County. *Tacos de pescado* handed to you out of a window of one of these trucks are better, both for your wallet and your taste buds, than what you'd get at any sit-down establishment.

I'm glad folks are warming up to food trucks, although sometimes it strikes me as more hype than hope. I grew up eating at food trucks in Hawaii; we called them lunch wagons. Tsukenjo and Kewalo's were regular stops on our daily lunch rotation, so initially I had a hard time understanding what the big deal was about the food-truck movement. Especially since some excellent *mariscos* trucks, like Mariscos German,

have been serving up tasty *cócteles*, tacos, and tostadas for some time. I'll take that over the latest iteration of con-fusioned beef bulgogi tacos topped with canned mandarin oranges and sriracha-based sauce any day of the week.



dard prelude to a *mariscos* meal. The hours are also the same, starting at about 10:00 a.m. and closing later in the afternoon.

I've been eating at Mariscos el Pescador for almost two years. The truck is located in the parking lot of the Toys "R" Us off

When it comes to fish tacos, two of my favor-

ite trucks are located in Chula Vista, a mere two

the I-5 L Street exit in Chula Vista. You can't miss it. The drill is simple: first, get in line at the order window. It used to be that the folks here didn't speak much English, but things have changed. You order your fish taco, maybe throw in a *gobernador* (sautéed shrimp-onion-bell-pepper taco) or perhaps a *taco de marlin* (smoked fish). Then you give them your name. For some reason, they often get mine wrong, but they can call me whatever they want as long as I get my tacos.

Out of another window, a few cups of consommé will appear. One of them has your name on it, figuratively, of course. Eventually, tacos appear in a little tray on the sill. I've never seen the system fail. You either pay up front or wait and order some more. The fish tacos here will set you back a buckand-a-quarter. Each has a generous piece of whitefish, battered and fried to a golden brown. There's a nice flavor to the batter, and the fish is always moist; occasionally, there's a mild sweetness, to boot. The fish is topped with shredded cabbage, pico de gallo, cilantro, and onions. Then there's the all-important crema Mexicana on top. I like the version at El Pescador. It isn't too heavy, or mayonnaise-y, nor is it a faux ranch-dressing topping. The proportion of toppings to tortilla and fish is perfect for my taste; this isn't a fried filet lost in a sea of cabbage, pico de gallo, and crema. If you visit Mariscos el

Pescador, I encourage you to try the *cócteles*. As for *aguachile* (where acid cooks the fish rather than heat), I think Mariscos German has them beat on that one.

A two-mile drive from Mariscos el Pescador, at the corner of Main and Fourth Avenue, is the Maricscos el Prieto truck. Residing in one of those warehouse-shopping complexes, I knew el Prieto was doing some serious business from the minute I drove into the lot. I'd never seen a *lonchera* with its own designated parking spaces.

food costs a buck), the fish was moist and tender. It's smaller than el Pescador, but I really enjoy the batter. There's a bit more cabbage and *pico de gallo* in these tacos, and the *crema* has more of a mayo flavor. The combination of textures overcomes any balance-of-flavor issues.

As I was finishing up my tacos from el Prieto, elbows propped on the hood of my car; a breeze blew over the strawberry fields across the street. It was the perfect dessert for a satisfying meal. ■

Grant Grill Dishing the "Father-lode" for Dad's Day

I don't make it a habit to post menus, but some sound so tantalizing that I can barely help myself with Grant Grill's Father's Day Beer, Barley, & Hops menu, June 18 to 24.

Grant Grill's beverage director, Jeff Josenhans, has come up with pairings for the brew-friendly courses and created a cocktail called the "Hopped Manhattan Sour."

This tipple starts out with a base of muddled Williamette hops (used in brewing to impart mild bitterness and a massive floral nose) and builds courtesy of a 100-day barrel-aged variety of rye whiskey that Josenhans crafted in Utah to commemorate the US Grant's 100th year in operation. Pressed lemon and egg whites add dimension and texture to stand up and with a duck sausage dish that includes figs, cherries, a wild fennel tart (likely made using wild fennel from the Grant's rooftop garden), and a syrup made from yet another beer ingredient: malt.

Guests may choose to have three courses (\$40 alone or \$60 with pairings), four courses (\$60 alone or \$85 paired), or five courses (\$80 alone or \$110 paired). It's a bit on the pricey side, but if your dad is anything like my son's dad, his love of suds and their power to make the trials of parenthood seem more bearable makes it all seem worth it.

TRUFFLED CHICKEN CROQUETTES RECIPE BY ANTHONY SINSAY

Executive Chef, Harney Sushi, Old Town

I come from an Asian and Filipino background. My dad was in the Navy for 17 years and was the cook in our house. He died when I was 11, so there was a void there. I tried to fill his shoes. Even to this day, when I am in the kitchen, I feel closer to him. So that was how I got my start.

I was born and raised in San Diego, so I'm a homegrown boy. After culinary school, I worked at the Viceroy Hotel in Las Vegas but was looking for an excuse to move back to California. When I was offered a job at the Platinum Hotel and Spa in Santa Monica, I took it.

Now, I'm happy to be back in San Diego at Harney Sushi. Here, my focus is on everything that isn't

HOW TO DO IT In a stockpot simmer whole chicken in chicken stock, thyme, parsley, bay leaves, celery, and onion until chicken is tender and

falling off the bone, about an hour. (Use large cooking spoon to skim off any grayish-white foam that develops on surface of liquid; repeat periodically and regulate heat to keep liquid from reaching a boil.) Then, remove the herbs, celery, and onion with a slotted spoon and discard. Remove the chicken and allow to cool. Reserve the stock. (Can be done a day ahead. Reserve chicken and stock in refrigerator.)

When chicken is cool enough to handle, remove the meat from the bones and shred it. In a separate large saucepan, melt butter over low heat. Add flour and stir constantly with a whisk until well combined into a white roux. Slowly stir warm stock into the roux and simmer until the mixture is thick enough to coat the back of a spoon. Add chopped truffles, shredded chicken, and gelatin. Continue to cook until gelatin has completely melted and distributed evenly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Pour mixture into a cake pan or jelly-roll pan and allow to cool completely.

Make an egg-wash by combining the eggs and milk with a fork. Using a small melon-baller or ice-cream scoop, form the cooled croquette mixture into desired size and dredge in flour, then eggwash and coat in panko breadcrumbs. Form the croquettes into small, thick patties. Continue until you have finished all of the croquette mix.

In a frying pan or large pot, heat at least 2 inches of peanut oil until it reaches 365°. Fry croquettes until crispy on the outside and golden brown. Serve with a salad or pickled spring vegetables.

Gluten-free restaurants? An El Cajon reader (and doctor) wrote in: He and a number of his patients have developed gluten sensitivity. (What the hell is happening to our bodies lately? First the shrimp allergy. Then the horrible peanut allergy that's taken delicious peanut oil — not to mention chopped peanuts — out of the kitchens of Asian restaurants. And now, wheat gluten, a part of the civilized diet since, oh, 10,000 BC and ancient Egypt. What could be causing this? Aside from the shrimp thing, could it be a result of new varieties that yield more... something like that? If I don't watch out I could turn into a gluten "birther.")

After doing a search for "gluten" in my files for the last couple of years, here's all I turned up:

Proper Gastropub, 795 J Street (on pedestrian alley near 8th), 619-255-7520; *propergastropub.com*. Gluten-free food by request. Widely varied menu. I think there are a lot of items in which gluten would just be irrelevant, if you don't get something with bread.

Many top restaurants will extend themselves to meet their patrons' health needs. One that comes instantly to mind is 910 in La Jolla because pastry-chef Jack Fisher has always worked a lot with uncrusted fruit sweets and makes SD's best panna cotta (delicate "custard" made with cream, gelatin, sugar — no flour at all. It's basically cream Jell-O for the gods).

I'd advise staying away from "old fashioned" French restaurants (e.g., Bleu Boheme) where the chef is likely to use flour to thicken sauces. Modern French chefs (and chefs trained in French disciplines) nowadays make cream sauce by straight reduction, not with a roux. You're generally safe with sauces called "reduction" or "gastrique."

Mexican food: Cornflour has little or no gluten. (When you make cornbread, you have to add baking powder &/or baking soda and a liquid to make it rise.)

Venture out of the ordinary. Ethiopian food is one example: The huge pancakes called injera (serving as your plate and your spoon) are made with tef — ground seeds of a wild grass, totally gluten-free. Injera gets its bit of a "rise" through soda water and light, overnight fermentation. You can satisfy your "bread jones" without gluten-forming bread there.

Most Asian foods come with rice, which is lowor no-gluten. (To make a rice pastry rise, you typically have to add beaten egg white.) Even dim sum at Jasmine Bistro can work for you — you'll sadly have to skip a lot of delish dishes, but when you look at the wrappers on the wrapped dishes, choose the translucent white wrappers, made with rice flour or tapioca flour. Shrimp har gow, si! Pork siu mai, no!

If you live in El Cajon, land of the flying carpets of Chaldean restaurants, it's a matter of restraint — e.g., eating hummus and baba ganouj with a fork, not pita, and forgoing the pita wrap around the grilled meats. If you should happen to find couscous on a menu, they'll probably be okay for you (no promises here).

Since it became a modernrock station eight years ago, FM 94/9 has carried syndicated alternative-oldies show New Wave Nation on Sunday mornings. Hosted by the raspy-voiced Nina Blackwood, the show is dedicated to '80s-

uncommon. KSDS (88.3 FM), for instance, airs a night of blues-style music from 8 p.m. Saturday to 7 a.m. Sunday morning. For a commercial station like 94/9 to air a blues show is a rarity. "There are only five or six rock or classicrock stations in the whole

country that have a blues show," says a consultant who works with stations across the U.S. "I think [94/9] is the only alternative-rock station with a blues show."

the news. He says before 94/9 started airing Blackwood's show, his Sunday-morning Resurrection Sunday killed it in the ratings. "We were always in the top three among all stations...among all listeners," says West. "When Nina came along, it sort of fragmented that audience. That show has acted as a sort of spoiler, spoiling other people's glory. But, I welcome all her former listeners." West says 91X has been airing Resurrection Sunday since 1990. West has hosted the show for the past 13 years.

94/9 has had success with its other Sunday-morning specialty show, the all-reggae "Brunch with Bob and Friends," which airs 9 a.m. to noon. But some wonder how well blues will go over in the morning.

"It does seem like a nighttime thing," says Michael Kinsman, president of Blues Lovers United of San Diego. "It seems like [that time slot] starts the show off with a handicap. On the other hand, any blues on commercial radio is greatly welcomed. But people are going to have to find it. If it's done well, it could be a huge success."

Helping to spread the word will be T, the single-letternamed blues DJ who has been working at KSDS since 1978. "I have the longest-running prime-time blues show west of the Mississippi." His show, *Every Shade of Blue*, airs from

8 p.m. to midnight on Saturday and anchors an overnight block that includes blues, gospel, zydeco, and R&B. "The more blues on the radio

the better." T suggests having a blues show on commercial radio is a stretch. "God bless the sponsors who are putting up the money to sponsor it."

T says he has been blind for the past ten years. "I can't do requests anymore, but I can run the control room by myself. Most people who listen have no idea I can't see. I spend eight to ten hours each week getting the show ready." He says being blind has opened up his ears to new artists.

"Everybody who sends me a CD now gets a fair shot to be on the air. It used to be if some dorky white kid sent in a CD with his picture on the cover, chances are I wouldn't listen to it. Now I give everyone a fair shot."

Castro will headline what is being billed as a benefit show. "Any proceeds will go to the San Diego Food Bank," says Kinsman, who

hopes the event will draw at least 6000 people. Admission is \$10 and two cans of food. "At that price, we have a good shot."

An ex-Union-Tribune reporter, Kinsman coproduces the annual Oktoberfest in Ocean Beach. He writes

articles for Blues Revue magazine, and is currently working on a book about a bluesman named Watermelon Slim. He also produced a string of local blues festivals here between 1998 and 2003. ("My highest attendance was 4500 people.") The series was discontinued after 2003. "It was a losing proposition," Kinsman says.

Kinsman says he didn't want to produce any more blues festivals. "I just didn't have it in me. The San Diego Blues Festival meant a lot to me. The failure was hard." So, what brings him back into the arena? "I've been to events and I get excited by them." A willing sponsor with deep pockets, he says, was the tipping point. "This was not my idea. I couldn't afford to do it as a little guy. It just wasn't gonna happen." Vince Kasperick, founder and CEO of AimLoan.com, deserves the credit for creating this event, Kinsman says. "And Mitch Mitchell, former chairman of the Food Bank, embraced the idea immediately."

Production costs have all been underwritten by Aim-Loan.com. Kinsman explains that he is acting only as producer of this incarnation of the San Diego Blues Festival. "It's [the Food Bank's] event. All the admission, all the donations of canned food, and any excess funds we might make from the concessions will go to them."

avid Rinck's local ties date back to 1981, when the singer/guitarist/sax player cofounded the original Wallflowers. Somewhat punk, a little mod, and always rockin',

the band wrote songs about dangerous San Diego locales of the time, such as "Funland" (about a long-gone downtown game arcade

frequented by hookers and sailors) and "Paradise on 4th Avenue" (mainly chronicling that street's early punk hangout, Studio 517).

"To be honest, I feel sort of comfortable with places where there isn't a lot of law and order, possibly as a result of growing up with a less-thangreat relationship with authority," said Rinck.

Long after he departed San Diego, Rinck continued to perform and record with local players, including the Ramblers (with Music Power producer Eric Camillo), the Blues Gangsters, founded in 2008 with Dave Ellison (Rockin' Dogs), Dave Fleminger (the Answers), Kristi Maddocks (Everybody Violet), and fellow former-Wallflower Matt Johnson. Until just a few weeks ago, he was also playing with the reunited Cardiac Kidz, one of the city's earliest punk bands.

"Over the course of all these years, a sort of musical canon has evolved. I love tunes like 'Rubber Room' from the Wallflowers, 'Candy Rock' by the Rockin' Dogs, 'Find Yourself a Way' by the Cardiac Kidz, and 'Tigershark Blues' by the Blues Gangsters. Some of these songs I've played on several continents, with multiple bands."

Rinck is currently living in northern Africa. "Tunisia is a great place to be right now, because of the political opening, which is also producing all sorts of new freedoms for them in culture as well. They've been tied to France for many years, so there's a huge thirst for American music these

> days. San Diego bands that feel like coming out would find a great reception."

WHAT'S IN YOUR MUSIC PLAYER?

1. Stan Getz, João Gilberto, and Antonio Carlos Jobim, *Getz/Gilberto.* "I'm still primarily a saxophonist, and this is exactly how I wish I could play."

2. Faudel, Khaled and Rachid Taha, *1 2 3 Soleils*. "Algerian punk rock that comes from the brothels of Oran. Really profane stuff. These guys were basically gunned down in the streets for their music during the civil war in Algeria."

3. Cesaria Evora, *Café Atlantico*. "She has such a great voice. This CD takes me to a smoky piano bar in Cape Verde."

4. Chet Baker, *Chet Baker Sings.* "I love to hear what a great musician does when he puts his talents into interpreting classic numbers like this."
5. Jimmy Reed, *Just Jimmy Reed.* "He's my favorite guitarist, after Scotty Moore from Elvis's band."

WHERE IN SAN DIEGO DO YOU HANG OUT?

"Lestat's West. I like the coffee and the easygoing ambiance. It's my office when I'm in San Diego. And it's open 24/7. I love staying out all night."

FAVORITE CONCERT?

"Johnny Thunders & the Heartbreakers at the

Whisky a Go Go, about 1980. He was the king on a good night, one of the greatest bluesmen ever. The Muddy Waters of punk rock. They brought the house down that night."

IF YOU COULD TIME TRAVEL, WHEN/ WHERE WOULD YOU VACATION?

"I'd go back to 1977 London and go see all the punk-rock bands, just to see what it was really like. I bet it was fun as can be, in the halcyon days."

BEST DISH THAT YOU COOK?

"Peri-peri chicken. Or shrimp, when I can get good ones. I make the peri-peri sauce from oil, whiskey, and chili peppers, and let it sit in a jar for a year."

READ ANY GOOD BOOKS LATELY?

"I just went back and read *The Plague*, by Albert Camus, again. He was, of course, a *Pied-Noir* [French citizen in Algeria] who grew up in a poor neighborhood in Algiers called Belcourt. A lot of the French existentialists and post-modernists like Jacques Derrida and Michel Foucault — grew up in French North Africa, so I wanted to figure out why this region gave us so many countercultural figures."

LEAST FAVORITE MOVIE?

"*Eat Pray Love* was so bad that I would have walked out, but I was on a plane."

EVER BEEN A CRIME VICTIM?

"I used to live in Nairobi, and I was driving through this traffic-circle about 7 p.m. with my window down, and this kid came up and stole my cell phone out of my hand. His partner tried to stab me in the eye, so the first one got the phone while I was distracted, trying not to have my eye gouged out. I didn't really care about my phone. He could have just showed me the knife

A few weeks ago, The New York Times had an interesting article about how white rappers had moved from being outsiders in hip-hop to being the people carrying the torch of the old school - something like the way white guys have largely taken over Chicagostyle blues. The article made an interesting argument, but I thought it gave the mistaken impression that all white rappers are still wearing gold chains and Kangol hats. In fact, many of the leading emcees in the forwardlooking alternative/independent hip-hop scene are white. And perhaps the most remarkable

thing about their presence in the scene is that their skin color seems not to matter.

Aesop Rock is one of the most respected of these white indie rappers. Born lan Bavitz, Aesop Rock came out of New York around the turn of the millennium (he moved to San Francisco in 2005) and quickly gained a reputation for his artfully complicated lyrics and his laid-back delivery. He also has a knack for writing about unusual subject matter. On the 2007 None Shall Pass

Aesop has a track that begs astronomers to reinstate Pluto as a planet. At least I think that's what it's about — this is a guy who raps lines like "Flash that buttery gold, jittery zeitgeist/ Wither by the watering hole, Border Patrol."

His music is often just as difficult to pin down as his lyrics. Maybe that's part of the reason Aesop often collaborates with musi-



cians from both inside and outside the hip-hop

Critics called A Fever You Can't Sweat Out electro-dance and emo and vaudeville, but I heard power pop. In many ways, Panic! at the Disco reminded me of the Nerves, a 1970s pre-new-wave band that may have invented the three-minute melodic blast that would later make bands like the Knack and the Romantics rich. Many of those same critics bashed Fever and called the band's music irritating and the lyrics overwritten. Still, that debut CD sold double platinum. It was released in September of 2005, and by March of 2006 the band was headlining their own tour, and they'd landed an MTV Video of the Year award.

Perhaps as a result of having spent all that time on the road performing, Panic! At

the Disco changed when they followed up with Pretty. Odd. It veered into a slightly matured Eleanor-Rigbymeets-the-Buzzcocks sound. The band members were no longer teens on testosterone, but they still had heroic ideas, and by now they had the industry clout to pull them off. When they played Madison Square Garden during the Nothing Rhymes with Circus tour, that's exactly what they brought to the stage: a circus. Panic! at the Disco is an

other internet success story. Ryan Ross and Spencer Smith started the band while in high school in Las Vegas. They learned blink-182 covers in the ninth grade, and when they wrote and recorded a couple of originals, they posted them online. That got them signed and into the recording industry long before they'd performed in public as a band. Brendon Urie and drummer Spencer Smith are the current members of Paniel, with road-band warriors lan Crawford on guitar and Dallon Weekes on bass and synth

to flesh out the live sound. Now touring behind Vices & Virtues, they have matured even more over the years into melancholy emo dudes, but emo dudes who look on the bright side of things. Fun and Funeral Party also perform.

In the late '40s and early '50s, the Turf Supper Club was a magnet for bookies and horseracing enthusiasts, according to bartender Stacey Sloate. "They [had] a group here that would go to both Del Mar and Caliente, in Mexico," she tells me. A 1948 phone book lists the establishment as "The Turf Cocktail Lounge," Sloate says, before assuming its current name in the 1949 directory.

Specializing in the no-nonsense approach to cocktails (quality and quantity), the Turf Supper Club offers the same array of classic potions that probably helped even the odds of winners and losers in the club's

horse-powered heyday.

Edging close to 20 years of bartending, Sloate is an old hand at old fashioneds, Manhattans, and martinis. These last, she says, come as filthy dirty and/ or lip-curling dry as you want. Sloate has also helped inspire something of a comeback for the sidecar.

The Turf's sidecar is a cross between the original recipe (brandy, triple sec, lemon juice) and a margarita, due to the Turf's emphasis on lime to boost the flavor. "It's sweet but not too sweet and tart but not too tart," Sloate says. "For someone who's never had a sidecar before, I describe it as a brandy margarita with the citrus and sweet of a margarita without the harshness of the tequila.'

Incomplete

ow can evil and ugliness make a gift of beauty?"

When he was six, Asher Lev began noticing the contours and textures of the world. He became alert to shadings of color, to the

degrees of blackness in a shadow. His eye sought the unique in the everyday. He began to draw.

One day he sketched wet spots on his mother's face. Why?

It was a hot day, he said. The heat made them. He didn't know the word for perspiration. Asked why he added the spots, Asher said that was how she looked. His father Aryeh, an observant Jew, said the "foolish" portrait showed disrespect. Asher must never draw again. "Torah Jews do not become painters."

His son could have a gift, Aryeh admitted. But it may serve the Other Side. In Aryeh's Hassidic tradition, the world has a "good" side and sitra achtra, the Other, where "all that is evil lurks." Has drawing yanked Asher from the Being Without End and into the "realm of darkness and evil"?

But Asher is an observant Jew. He prays three times daily. He keeps kosher and practices festivals of his religion. He believes "it is a man's task to make life holy."

Chaim Potok's novel (1972) makes Asher the battleground for competing traditions. It's a portrait of a prodigy torn, according to his father, between the divine and the demonic. Jacob Kahn, the world-famous sculptor who worked alongside Picasso, disagrees. "Art is a religion," he tells Asher. "Become a great artist. That is the only way to justify what you are doing to everyone's life."

So, Asher draws and paints and follows his gift. He studies the icons of the Western tradition. He begins drawing nudes, then — because he can't find the painful expression on the man's face anywhere else — crucifixions. Two have the face of Asher's mother.

The novel's a gripping read. Potok's descriptions of how Asher learns to "feel with his eyes" make you want to explore beyond the familiar. Aaron Posner's 90-minute stage adaptation, how-

> ever, is so condensed it plays like a speed-read of the novel. Missing are the slow, agonizing percolation of Asher's identities, his parents' growing differences, and

Asher narrates much of the story, often with direct quotations from the book. Telling rather than showing the story places it in the past, while theater thrives in the present (David Mamet: "the better the dramatist, the less the narration"). Two other actors join him in mini-scenes. Until the

Brian Mackey and Rachael VanWormer reprise their roles. Both excel. Mackey's garrulous speakers recall the title of Robert Scheer's Thinking Tuna Fish, Talking Death. And VanWormer (who won a Craig Noel Award in 2008 for the coldhearted killer in Medea Redux) plays two women worlds apart temperamentally. We are led gently into the magic of Buck's game and gab, his past grief and present glory. So saddle up, starting June 24. ★★★★

Korkoro

Writer-director Tony Gatlif is the bardic auteur of the Roma (Gypsies). Himself Roma of French-Algerian birth, Gatlif extends his ethnic filmography (*Vengo, Gadjo Dilo, Latcho* *Drom*) with *Korkoro*. This exceptionally well-grounded film about a migratory people is set in Vichy, France, as the Nazis tighten the noose and war shadows shiver through the tiny town and beautiful valley of the story.

Korkoro means "liberty." The main character, Claude, is played by engaging Mathias Laliberté. The runaway boy, perhaps Jewish, joins a Gypsy band of hard-living nomads who seem spiritually closer to their horses than their religion. Speaking French, but rootless, they come to a town where ancient fear of the Roma as outsiders provides fertile soil for local fascists (their leader is made hatefully vivid by Carlo Brandt).

Facing detention or worse, the little group is aided by a humane mayor (Marc Lavoine) and a schoolteacher (Marie-Josée Croze). They recognize that the Roma incarnate the freedom that France has lost. Protecting them, and Claude, becomes a form of resistance. Gypsy music is a dramatic enhancer, and the Roma actors are compellingly raffish. Also a touch crazy in wild, thieving Taloche (James Thiérrée, a grandson of Charlie Chaplin, who moves as if he has mime in the blood).

Canny in many ways, the Gypsies are nearly as naïve about politics as the French boy who becomes a foolish collaborator in Louis Malle's *Lacombe, Lucien*. This movie drawn from actual lives goes fatefully where it must, without a single dull moment. Julien Hirsch's photography is a richly textured asset all the way. One shot, involving a watch, resonates the Holocaust as well as any single image has on film.

The Art of Getting By

At 19, Freddie Highmore is no longer a child actor. But *The Art of Getting*

By sells him as the cutest boy-muffin since MGM's Freddie Bartholomew, or at least since the '70s high time of moon-faced Bud Cort. Closeups arrive like panting groupies as pale, brainy George (Highmore) flops through his last term at a New York private school. George is shy, sensitive, and tormented by angst, despite obvious talent as an artist. Adorable Sally (Emma Roberts) seems the obvious cure for his blues, but they diddle through "just friends" gambits until near the finish, all the while trading soft zingers.

Writer and debut feature-director Gavin Wiesen probably nailed some career chits by using Steven Spielberg's daughter Sasha as partyminded Zoe, and he has solid veterans like Tom Hanks's wife Rita Wilson, Sam Robards, Blair Underwood, and Alicia Silverstone. He should have spent more time scripting this blandly debonair coming-of-age carousel,

Bride Flight

Before the "chick flick," there was the "woman's picture." Each term can trigger facile male dismissal. I won't dismiss *Bride Flight*, though it blends those labels into a mix flavored with tears, erotic sweat, and Dutch cocoa. We're in a retro dimension where *Imitation of Life* meets *The Group*, one in which the heroines fly from austere, postwar Holland to fabulously spruce New Zealand: the sad-eyed but lovely Ada (Karina Smulders), plainspun but indomitable Marjorie (Elise Schaap), and stylish early feminist Esther (Anna Drijver).

They come on a celebrated airrace flight, bond instantly, and then braid their man-sharing, babyswitching destinies into a soapy saga. Their favorite bed bazooka is Frank (Waldemar Torenstra), a Dutch émigré winemaker. If only he were not such a nice guy, he could be the Aryan super-hunk that insane Nazi Gregory Peck strives to create in The Boys from Brazil. Director Ben Sombogaart and writer Marieke van der Pol briefly toss in Rutger Hauer as Frank in old age, as well as a volcanic steam pit, a WWII blockhouse, a fire-breathing Calvinist preacher, Esther's flight from Judaism into fashion design, and torrid lust that would have melted Hollywood's old Production Code. Stale at the core, this chick-driven time capsule has some fresh and vivid touches around the edges. **

Newsreel: Congratulations to those who dreamed long and worked hard to revive the Village Theatre in Coronado. Dark for a decade, the cherished but then run-down theater has been revamped as a boutique three-screener. The gala opening is June 24.

After the festive debut, questions will linger: How viable can this triplex be on an island that did not sustain one screen profitably? Can the two 45-seat "screening rooms" be more than curios? Are the retro-Deco touches only chrome on a popcorn box? Can standard filler like *Cars 2* (the first offering) pull San Diegans across the big blue bridge? Will the programmers take chances? Once the Village is fully functional, I hope to visit and ponder some answers.

Rarely (but it happens), the best thing



in a movie theater is a play. That may occur when the Reading Gaslamp 15 presents Oscar Wilde's infallibly witty *The Importance of Being Earnest* the title now appended with *Live in HD* — for 7 p.m. showings June 22 and 23. Brian Bedford directed and stars as Lady Bracknell in the Roundabout Theatre's acclaimed Broadway production, featuring Dana Ivey, Paxton Whitehead, Santino Fontana, and David Furr. Tickets, \$20, available at *ReadingCinemasUS.com*.

Beginners — When writer-director Mike Mills isn't flashing oodles of perky technique and "stylish" doodads (drawings, meet-cutes, old news clips, vintage music), his talented cast inserts human value and charm into this tale of a nice, lonely guy (Ewan McGregor) who lost his suddenly gay, then dead dad (Christopher Plummer) and finds love with a free-minded beauty (Mélanie Laurent). Facile but enjoyable, glib but not grating, the movie includes Plummer's Jack Russell terrier Arthur, perhaps the friskiest movie pooch since Bogart's Pard in High Sierra, or at least Richard Dreyfuss's Matisse in Down and Out in Beverly Hills. 2011. — D.E. ★★ (HILLCREST; FROM 6/17)

Bridesmaids — A raunchy comedy with integrity from star and cowriter Kristen Wiig. The movie is unquestionably from a female perspective, a quality that is pervasive but never exclusive. Wiig plays Annie, a heart-ravaged, recession-broken middle-ager struggling to maintain an emotional parallel with her best friend whose life is on the up-and-up. The chief area of contention is the latter's upcoming nuptial, for which Annie is the maid of honor. Wiig achieves a splendid vulnerability. Fast Five — Ocean's 11-style caper pic with more mayhem and darker skin. (Paul Walker's whiteness here gleams like marble; his performance is similarly statuesque.) You get plenty of pretty machines and pretty ladies to go with your muscles, explosions, and bro-banter, but for a film stuffed with two of the hardest hardbodies in showbiz, it's awfully soft in the middle. Quite beyond the stern eloquence of prosecutor Robert H. Jackson, the film (narrated by Liev Schreiber) is a staggering witness to infamy, though the Jewish Holocaust is shortserved. 2011. - D.E.
