

#### UNDER THE RADAR

Junk food for lobbyists The San Diego County Regional Airport Authority's master concession agreement with HMSHost is expiring next year, and the battle over a replacement has turned into a gold rush for local lobbyists.

With the competition reportedly wrapping up soon, the bidding is getting serious. Two contract hopefuls have featured prominently in Tom Blair's Union-Tribune column: New York-based airport management giant OTG is touting local names in its proposed vendor lineup, including Burger Lounge, Barrio Star, and Searsucker. High Flying Foods, a "family-run, woman-owned business"

from San Francisco, is claiming Stone Brewing Company, Saffron, Pannikin, and Phil's BBQ.

But while the feel-good PR wars continue at the U-T, behind the scenes at the airport authority the proposers are bringing in the big guns for a showdown. The prize: literally millions and millions of dollars in revenue from high-priced food, booze, books, and trinkets purchased each year by airport-goers.

According to airport authority lobbying disclosure reports, OTG is using the Clay Company, Inc., run by Nikki Clay, wife of now-retired superlobbyist Ben Clay. High Flying Foods has hired Richard Ledford of Ledford Enterprises, Inc., a onetime chief of staff to ex-mayor Susan Golding and a major political donor whose clients have included Allied Waste, the University of California, and a Long Beach outfit that wanted to privatize the city's streetlight operation.

A third contender, SSP America, owned by a British-based multinational, is using Kim Hale of Public Policy Strategies, the outfit owned by Jerry Sanders insider Tom **Shepard**. Hale is married to the mayor's director of communications, Darren Pudgil. Then there's **A. Christopher** Wahl of Southwest Strategies, who's

working for the ubiquitous Australian multinational Westfield Concession Management. Karen Hutchens of Hutchens PR, an SDG&E veteran, has picked up Delaware North Companies, the giant outfit that edged **Diane Powers** out of a state lease at Old Town's Bazaar del Mundo. Jack Monger, another Sanders insider, is working for Pacific Gateway Concessions, also a San Francisco outfit. Ex-water authority chairwoman Chris Frahm

of Brownstein Hyatt Farber Schreck represents Hudson Group/Hudson News, "a wholly-owned subsidiary of international duty-free travel retailer Dufry AG of Basel Switzerland," according to its website. And Herman Collins, former aide >> to the late Cheetahs-strip-clubcase-defendant Charles Lewis, is representing Paradies Shops, a big Atlanta, Georgia-based airport retail management firm.

1991. When he ran unsuccessfully for a seat of the board of the Imperial Irrigation District in February 2004, the Imperial Valley Press attacked him in an editorial. "We're concerned that Paramo, in taking money from Imperial Group farmers, is in favor of transferring ownership of the Imperial Valley's water rights to private parties. We're opposed to that. We also look askance at Paramo having an employee of the San Diego County Water Authority working in the upper echelons of his campaign." The paper added, "We are concerned about Paramo pledging to keep his job with the state Department of Corrections if he is elected. [Irrigation district] directorships are paid as full-time positions because they are full-time positions." Paramo succeeds warden George A. Neotti, who is retiring. In a telephone interview

this week, Paramo said the people at the I.V. # What? No War?

nce again, Americans are beginning to talk about guns versus butter. Do we want to remain a military superpower, nomic conversion, but their or do we want our social safety net and our corpoinfluence is anemic. rate welfare programs? Now, United States mili-

In San Diego, guns are butter. Directly and indirectly, military spending accounts for more than 20 percent of the local economy and one-fourth of the jobs.

Therefore, it is prudent for San Diego to plot a course in case the nation's voters express a desire to turn swords into plowshares — to convert, at least partially, military weapons, technologies, and personnel to peaceful uses. The concept goes by several names, including arms conversion and economic conversion, and in the past, it has generated far more talk than action.

Nonetheless, San Diego is considering the question. Leadership of the San Diego Association of Governments is discussing the matter and may appoint a committee to study the ramifications of possible arms conversion, says Marney Cox, chief economist for the organization. The entire establishment — elected officials, universities, etc. — is "very supportive of more, not less, military" but may have to bow to the national will. There are small groups in the county devoted to eco-



tary spending is burgeoning. Officially, it is around 20 percent of the federal budget. But critics say that's vastly understated. If you take into account supplemental defense budgets, veterans' benefits, military retirement, State Depart-

# **Thief Does His Homework**

# Gaylene Taylor and Mary Hyde opened the jewelry store as usual at 9:00 a.m. on an overcast Wednesday in October. Taylor,

52, and her coworker Hyde, 55, were longtime, trusted employees at Mulloys jewelers, which in 2009 had been at the same location for 22 years, on State Street in Carlsbad.


Taylor put her lunch in the refrigerator, and then she had a little trou-

ble opening the tall safe in the back. Finally, she got it opened, and Hyde took several trays of jewelry to the front to set up the displays. While Hyde arranged the diamonds and gold, Taylor took the jewelry that needed cleaning into the "steam room." The women

chatted as they worked.

"And I turned around and he was there," Taylor remembered. It was so upsetting that when she recounted the event months later her voice faltered and she choked up. "He was all covered. He had a mask on." The man was right behind Taylor in the back of the store. He wore dark gloves and a mask and a hooded sweatshirt. In one hand he held a black gun that was pointed at her, and with his other hand he reached out toward her and said, "Come with me." But Taylor resisted. "He tried to take me to the front and I

wouldn't go." The woman threw herself to the floor and began to scream out the Lord's Prayer. "I just kept screaming it and screaming it and screaming it!"

#### Yellowtale

In the cover story on the beer microbrewing industry in San Diego County ("Beer Heaven," July 7), the reporter incorrectly cited the name of one of Ballast Point Brewing Company's brews, calling it Yellowtail Pale Ale. This is

evidence that despite a visit to the brewery and an interview with one of its brewmasters, he did not discover that this name is obsolete. The brew's name was changed to "Pale Ale," probably in fall 2010. Three months ago, sandiegobeerblog.com probed the matter (sandiegobeerblog. com/2011/04/12/ballastpoints-pale-ale-has-lost-its*yellowtail-in-name-only*).

It has been rumored that last vear, Ballast Point was sued for trademark infringement for the use of the name "yellowtail." If indeed this is about an allegation of trademark infringement, the brewery has puzzlingly adopted a secretive handling that is uncustomary for such cases. The brewery did not see fit to announce the name change but left its customers to stumble onto it over months, if not years. The blogger contacted the company and was rewarded with a minimal confirmation from its CEO. In the end, the blogger reported being unable to pin down the date of the name change nor the reason for it, nor was he able to confirm the identity of any complainant.

*Ed Bedford responds: Dale is* right, but the name change has definitely been done on the QT. Nobody corrected me when I blithely used the "Yellowtail" word at Ballast. Jeff Hammett, in the San Diego Beer Blog article cited above, writes that Ballast's Jack White emailed him, saying, *"We are changing the name"* for legal reasons. We can't discuss the issue in detail...."

The buzz, which I can in no way confirm, is that an Australian vineyard with a similar moniker might possibly have had something to do with it. Notice I'm being cagey, too. These legal name disputes can get really nasty. Whatever, talking of the fish *identity theme, the, uh, net* result is that the Pale Ale is now the only one in Ballast's year-round beer lineup not named after a fish. Like, Sculpin, Black Marlin, Cal-

always thought shingles — the sickness, not roof tiles — was an old person's disease. Even the Centers for Disease Control recommends vaccines only for people over 60. I was shocked they let me stay home from school for so long for what seemed like a farce of a sickness. Had I known about all this, I would have tried to get chicken pox much sooner.

Shingles comes from the same strain of virus as chicken pox. Shingles is also known as "herpes zoster," which sounds like a German insult. The year my father turned 60 - just weeks before he was planning to get the vaccine — he came down with shingles, while en route to

"Wow, that 60 thing is pretty accurate," I'd told him after he came home and explained what had happened. # STRAIGHTFROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

#### Hey, Matthew:

Why can't we have blue or green hair? We can have blue or green eyes, and isn't melanin responsible for coloring our hair and our eyes? So why no blue hair?

— Anonymous, via email

Why no naturally blue hair (or skin, for that matter) since, yes, melanin is involved in coloring all three of them? Well, let's take hair first, since it's simplest. Hair follicles contain two types of melanin: eumelanin, which comes in black- and brown-pigment types; and pheomelanin, a red pigment. Blue is not an option. Neither is green. All hair-shaft colors are made up of some genetically controlled combination of these two basic pigments, and both melanins can be present in a single follicle. That's why, when you bleach dark brown or black hair, you get orange. The less-stable eumelanin is stripped away and the more-stable, harder-tobleach pheomelanin is left.

(Blond hair results from a very low level of the brown-type eumela-

nin). The genetic jury is still out on all the fine points of the expression of hair-color pigments, but those are the basics. Hair, eyes, and skin are genetically coordinated, making common combinations that we recognize (blond hair, pale skin, blue eyes), but our hair-color potential is limited to variations on the two melanins. Yes, unfair, I agree.

Eyes are a completely different matter, even though the same eumelanin is involved. Eye colors are created by light scattering through three layers of eye tissue: the outer pigmented layer, a layer of semi-opaque tissue, and an inner pigmented layer. In our eyes, we have a wider choice of pigments than in hair: brown eumelanin, yellow lipochrome, and blue. Eyescience guys have found at least six genes that control the expression of each of these pigments. They suspect there are many more, and the process is very complicated. But basically it's the ratio of brown to blue to yellow and the distribution of the pigment in the iris area that give us our unique eye appearance. And because eye color is created by light reflection and scattering, it's much more variable than is hair color, which doesn't rely on light rays passing through layers of pigmented tissue. Blue eyes under one light condition might appear blue-gray under another. The expression of eye

color is so genetically complicated that virtually any parents can produce a child with virtually any eye color. The odds might be slim, but the situation isn't reliable fodder for gossip.



I live in PB, and the homeless transients are always digging in the trash and eating out of it. How do they avoid E. coli when people go into the fine establishments and die from food being served there? Can I grow E. coli in my own trash can? – CG, via email

Well, it's not like they're heeldragging *E. coli* victims out of George's at the Cove every night. "Fine" establishments don't kill customers any oftener than a taco truck does. In fact, an *E. coli* breakout isn't all that common, no matter where the food comes from. About a quarter of a million people are diagnosed with the infection each year in the U.S., according to the CDC. I see what you're get-

ting at, but limiting the potential evils of dumpster diving to *E. coli* 

will make a trash can seem as safe as a professional kitchen. Sort of.

E. coli is a big, diverse group of bacteria that lives in the guts of cattle, sheep, goats, deer, and elk; but, once transmitted, it can survive in pigs, birds, and people. A toxin produced by the bacteria is what's potentially harmful. Large outbreaks can begin at the farm end of the food chain - vegetables contaminated with infected manures or water. Slaughterhouses can introduce the bacteria into a meat product. The FDA is in charge of regulating food growers and processors to prevent all this, but obviously it does happen. But you can also get your own individual good dose from an infected restaurant cook who hasn't been conscientious about hand-washing. So, you don't have to be dipping in a dumpster to get E. coli. And the average poor soul who relies on trash for a meal isn't at much more risk than the rest of us. And there's been no *E. coli* epidemic in the Freegan community.

The diver, actually, is more likely to pick up hepatitis or some other such disease if he/she consumes food that a sick person has started to eat but discarded. Well wrapped, date-stamped food thrown out by a supermarket or the like is actually pretty safe (except seafood, meat, eggs, or raw milk, cheese, or juice).

## Diocese: Visiting Priest "Not Familiar with Local Practice"


A San Diego man's Catholic funeral parade was moved from India Street in Little Italy to the grounds of Holy Cross Cemetery this week after a priest objected because the man was gay. "At least the dead don't complain," explained bishop Robert Brom in a moment of unusual candor.

Tuesday, the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Diego said in a statement that the funeral parade for 75-year-old Barry DiSangiovese who owned *Popefuckers.com*, a popular website for Catholic-themed gay porn — "may take place." The statement, from chancellor Rodrigo Valdivia, said the person objecting to the initial funeral arrangements was "some yokel from out of town who wasn't exactly hip to the concept of irony" and who was "not familiar with local practice."

The refusal to hold a parade in Little Italy prompted a small group of gay Catholics to gather outside the church Monday night to sing the score from Jesus Christ Superstar and leave a note for the diocese seeking a clear policy on funeral parades, including the maximum acceptable number of nun impersonators, sanctioned methods of self-flagellation, and civil air pollution regulations on incense.

Among those six or eight people were Nicole Murray Ramirez, a member of the San Diego Human Relations Commission, and Tom Kirkman, former president of Dignity/San Diego, the local chapter of a national advocacy group for gay Catholics.

"I met [DiSangiovese] several months ago," Ramirez said. "To be real honest, he was everything a Christian should be. He was very giving, he loved Jesus, and he loved pictures of men in cassocks making sweet, sweet love to one another. He had many, many friends who felt the same way. A lot of business people in any community don't give back; they kind of just run with the money. But even if I couldn't pay my monthly membership fee for the site, he could never say no."



# Working It



Chase Catania aims to be a NASCAR racer.

y first race was at Orange Show Speedway in San Bernardino. I was 15 and it was Legends cars." El Cajon's Chase Catania, now 20 years old, is talking into a tinny cell phone from faraway North Carolina. He's a driver in the seven-week, ten-race Summer Shootout Series at Charlotte Motor Speedway. Said series is known for producing future NASCAR drivers.

Chase began racing in 2007, claiming Rookie of the Year honors at Orange Show Speedway. Since then he has racked 135 starts, 107 finishes in the top five, and 65 wins.

Chase says, "Legends are scaled-down [5/8 scale] versions of a '34 Ford coupe and '37 Chevy sedan. They've got 150 horsepower in a 1250cc Yamaha motorcycle engine and weigh 1200 pounds. Legends cars teach you the whole deal about racing: power control, keeping the wheels under you, getting the car to go straight.

"In the [Charlotte Motor Speedway] Legends car series [classifications], they're Young Lions, Semi-Pro, and Pro. I've run enough races to where I'm graduated up to the Pro division and run with the top guys in the nation."

I ask, "Where did you get money?"

"My dad, mainly," Chase says. "He raced when I was growing up, got me a Legends car when I was 15. He started racing in Bomber Stock [usually dirt-track racing], went to Street Stock. The last race car he drove was a modified open-wheel 600-horsepower at the El Cajon Speedway."

Chase tells me he went to Grossmont High School, graduated in 2010. "I was probably the only kid that raced in high school. Everybody knew me as the kid who raced. I was gone every Friday, gone racing. It was pretty cool." "Were you winning races from the beginning?"

Chase says, "Yeah, I think it was my third or fourth race. We went out to Lake Havasu and won my first main event there. Qualified first, started third, got the lead, and never looked back."

I ask, "What does it take to make it all the way to NASCAR?"

"It's about having consistent finishes, running good, qualifying good, and winning. I started in Legends, ran those for three or four years. Then, last year, I started in Late Model, which is a full-sized car, a step up from the Legends cars. And then I've run a couple ASA Speed Truck races. Speed Truck is similar to Late Model."

"What's the next step?"

"Second week of July I'll be doing an ARCA [Automobile Racing Club of America] at Gresham Motorsports Park."

For readers who are motor-sports deficient, I should note that most ARCA cars have been used in NASCAR races. ARCA has a national circuit, races on superspeedways, is televised on SPEED, and regarded as a traditional stepping stone into NASCAR.

Chase says, "Money is an issue for me. As you get higher in racing, it gets way more expensive; it's all about money at that point. I'll do the ARCA test and then, if I come up with some sponsorship, I'll do a race at Berlin, Michigan, in the ARCA Series."

"So, now it's about getting sponsors?"

Chase says, "Unless you have a rich family, you've got to get somebody to back you up. There are people out there who will put money up for one particular driver if he has the talent and they can see he has a future. So far, I'm on that path. I've turned enough heads to get me to where I am now.

"There are a bunch of people trying to do the same thing I am; only a very select group make it. They usually have talent and money. You've got to come up with both and do well when you test the ARCA car."

I ask, "You get one shot? If you're not having a good race at the ARCA test, then that's it for you?"

"Pretty much, yeah. For me, that's how it would be. A lot of people can keep going because they have money. I'll probably get one shot at it. I have belief in myself. I've run my Late Model six times and won three races, so I know I have the talent. It's just a matter of if everything goes right.

"I'm in good hands. The guy who will be crew-chiefing the ARCA car is Gene Roberts. He was Bill Elliot's former crew chief back when Elliot was winning championships. There are a lot of good people behind me. I've gone forward ever since I set foot in a race car. Hopefully, I can keep carrying on and make it to NASCAR. Any form of NASCAR would be great."

# Where do they go when the races are over?

exactly, do they end up after Del Mar?

In search of a clearer vision of the golden years of a Thoroughbred racehorse, I accompanied Karen Groebli one morning as she showed me around a succession of far-flung ranches. It's among these bosky patches of San Diegostyle ruritania that Groebli runs Tijuana River Valley Animal Rescue, an operation that focuses on horses, including a dozen or so Thoroughbreds off the track.

According to Groebli, the overwhelming majority of Thoroughbred racehorse owners are responsible and committed to lifelong stewardship of these animals. The reason is money. Few racehorse owners make much, however, which means that for most the lure isn't riches but the prestige of ownership, coupled with a plain old love of horses. Money is also the root of other, less-celebrated proclivities, including, e.g., the relinquishment of horses whose presence in the barn no longer makes economic sense.

> "To some owners and trainers,

racehorses, once they no longer make them any money, are disposable," Groebli said. "It costs a minimum of \$100 a day to keep a horse in training at the track. Some of the less conscientious owners will tell a trainer, 'Get rid of this horse.' There's a little black market out there, well-connected people, gobetweens who can dispose of horses."

But before one can discuss the end of a Thoroughbred, it is necessary to examine its beginnings.

"There's a little black market out there, well-connected people, go-betweens who can dispose of horses." The life cycle of the Thoroughbred racehorse is more complex than it might appear to outsiders, folks whose notion of racing's "back side" is the well-muscled hindquarters of an oftenobject of an intense love affair, the fire of which drives men and women to become racehorse owners, despite the slim chance they'll turn a profit. Which leads us to a question: How does one go about becoming

truculent, four-legged athlete. This prized beast — whose forebears' characteristics ("conformation" to the cognoscenti) came to a place of standardization in England around 1800 — is not only the heart of a multi-billiondollar business, but the the owner of a Thoroughbred racehorse?

According to the United Pegasus Foundation, one of the nation's largest horseretirement ranches, approximately 34,000 Thoroughbreds are born each year in the United States. Many, if not most, are bred explicitly for racing. Some owners are themselves breeders, people in California, Florida, and Kentucky (to name the most important states) who await the outcome of a mare's 11-month gestation. If all goes well, the result is a spindly foal typically born from January through June. Other owners, either as individuals or parts of syndicates, buy directly from breeders or from auctions, the latter events held in locales such as Fairplex Park up in Pomona, Ocala, Florida, and Keeneland, Kentucky.

No matter how one acquires a young Thoroughbred, in order to run it, you've got to register it with the Jockey Club, founded in 1894 and headquartered in Lexington, Kentucky. Once you have the requisite paperwork, the next step — done at the track — is a lip tattoo; this equine ink serves, among other things, as a safeguard against racehorse identity theft. (In recent years, the collection of DNA samples has been introduced.)


Horses of racing age (two and up) are often acquired via the claim box, where trainers, usually representing owners, will, before the start of a claiming race, agree to buy a certain horse for a specified claiming price. At Del Mar, this price may be as high as \$100,000 or as low as \$8000. Once the gates are sprung, the horse — no matter how or even *if* the horse finishes — is now the responsibility

of the new owner. It's a calculated gamble: Is the horse sound? Can it win, or even race again? Because the connections aren't required to divulge veterinary records, it comes down to trust, intuition, and the ability to judge a horse on sight.

It's at the bottommost rungs of the claiming ladder where

abuses are most likely to occur. This has led certain animal-rights groups to allege that the picture of a wizened horse grazing in a verdant, white-fenced pasture is too often fictional. To be fair, horse racing has a dark side to its "back side." A few callous (or simply indifferent) owners and trainers make decisions that result in sub-idyllic retirements for some Thoroughbreds. For the least fortunate ruminants, gloomier destinations may await, including, in extreme cases, Canadian or Mexican slaughterhouses. It's in those plants, most horse-welfare advocates lament, that "old" (though some are as young as three) racehorses suffer the worst of the worst outcomes.

That journey sometimes starts when an owner finds that he has a surplus horse, often a Thoroughbred who's not paying his way because he's too slow to win or too unsound

horse. In the classic "kill/buy" scenario, the first stop is often a horse auction in Riverside or San Bernardino County, held in places such as Chino, Corona, Mira Loma, or Ontario.







From that group, only 5 have been documented as having reached the clutches of a kill buyer, and in those cases, there were intermediate stops, twists, and turns on the way. Thus, during Del Mar's brief seaside meet, one is unlikely to see a horse whose last race will be followed by tragedy.

I spoke with Del Mar CEO Joe Harper, whose affection for racing as a way of life, as an entity beyond the balance sheet, is palpable. "You know, I didn't get into it because I wanted to be in the racetrack business; it was because I loved horses." Of Thoroughbred retirement, he says, "Most end up on a farm, living out their days pleasantly. The possibility [of slaughter] always

Earlier this year, long before they could reach the starting gate, three of Price's twoyear-old "dreams" were found abandoned at a farm in Bonsall. At first, they were in good hands, boarded at Santa Ysabel's sprawling E.A. Ranches. (Started decades ago by the venerable Ernest Auerbach [no relation to Madeline], the 1000-acre spread was until recently a local Thoroughbred breeding facility rivaled in size only by Golden Eagle Ranch, which has also folded.) However, as months passed, Price failed to pay his boarding fees; eventually he was served with a summons for a smallclaims lawsuit. He reluctantly forked over \$7500, then contracted with well-known horse shipper R.D. Hubbard to have the trio moved to another barn. When Karen Groebli got wind of what had transpired - it's called "abandonment" among equinophiles — she retrieved the horses and tailored them to her operation.

(Price did not return telephone calls soliciting comment.)

Until a few years back, abandonment and other issues related to Thoroughbred retirement didn't generate a lot of buzz. Naysayers point out that equine senior citizens, even the most eminent, were not always treated with such reverence. Their poster horse is named "Ferdinand."

Foaled in Kentucky in 1983, Ferdinand's first start was at Del Mar in September 1985. He was a standout, amassing \$3,777,978 in earnings with eight wins from 29 starts; victories included the 1986 Kentucky Derby and the 1987 Breeder's Cup Classic. Retired to stud in 1989, his get — his offspring — saw scant success, and he was sold to a Japanese breeding outfit in 1994. In 2002 (the precise date has never been determined) he met his demise at the slaughterhouse, his well-muscled loins destined for pet food. Discomfited and embarrassed, if not shocked, by Ferdinand's unseemly denouement and the uproar that followed, horse-racing insiders began to train a spotlight on the behindthe-scenes bogeymen of horse racing: the kill buyer and the abattoir.



In 2007, she founded the California Retirement Management Account, or CARMA, a not-forprofit organization which raises and distributes grants to horseretirement and rescue operations. According to its website, the group is "dedicated to the goal of providing funding for the rehabilitation, retraining and/or retirement of Thoroughbred horses that have raced in California."

To that end, the group — whose board of directors includes such racing luminaries as jockeys Mike Smith (of Zenyatta fame) and Gary Stevens (seen in the movie *Seabiscuit*) — has established a program under which owners donate one-third of one percent of purse money to the cause. On May 1, 2011, Magna Enter(site of the Preakness), and many other racetracks — announced

As for Thoroughbred slaughter, Auerbach maintains that, at least for horses on the major SoCal circuit, it's a thing of the past. "As a society, we've evolved." Although she acknowledges that an "informal underground network" once existed to secrete discarded Thoroughbreds from the track to the cannery, she's confident that the surreptitious trade no longer exists in California. She says this is due less to legislation than wilting pressure and intense opprobrium, the most effective approach being self-policing by the industry. (California's statutory ban on in-state slaughter was enacted in 1998 pursuant to ballot Proposition 6.)

Auerbach takes issue with those who, in the name of horse welfare, would like to abolish horse racing. "They want all horses to roam free." Groups such as People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), she says, are ignorant about the intrinsic nature of the horse and the relationship that has bonded horse and man for thousands of years. "Horses have driven civilization. Next to the dog, the horse is man's best friend."

New equine careers aren't always idyllic, though; according to racing insiders, a small number of Thoroughbreds (there's no accurate count) end up "retrained" in an apocryphal array of what some call "illegal sports." Apparently, the organizers run in the same circles as folks who set up cockfights and dogfights. Alluding to the Mexican rodeo,

or *charreada*, my contact tried her best to be circumspect: "It's centered around a certain rural Southern California subculture. There are backyard rodeos, often on small ranches, where they have events like 'tripping.'" (In tripping, or *mangana*, a rider on horseback attempts to bring down another horse, usually a filly, by roping its front legs; catastrophic, often fatal injuries are common and the practice has been illegal in California since 1994.) "They also wager on match races where the horses run down dry riverbeds. The horses are all hyped up on amphetamines. No vets, of course." No matter how infrequent the worstcase endings, Karen Groebli, a native San Diegan who first visited the track as a toddler, has made it part of her mission to end such incidents by intervening before these bad-luck Thoroughbreds disappear. I asked her how common "unpleasant retirements" are nowadays. "It's declined," she admitted, "but the issue is still out there."

I prodded Groebli: "Why should people be concerned about this?" Noting that in Europe horse meat is considered a delicacy, I asked why the racing industry had, along with its most ardent critics, decided to crack down on the slaughter of racehorses. One reason, she said, is gastronomic. "They're full of drugs. There's a lifetime of buildup of things like Lasix and 'Bute'; it's unhealthy to eat them." (Both drugs are ubiquitous in American Thoroughbred racing. Lasix, the trade name for Furosemide, is a powerful diuretic used to control bleeding; "Bute" is short for Butazoli-

din, the trade name for Phenylbutazone, a non-steroidal antiinflammatory, similar to over-the-counter painkillers popped daily by humans.)





was purchased by Sarah Arena, a 20-year-old who hoped he'd make a good jumper. But he soon turned up lame with right-front suspensory problems and was given up to Groebli — "relinquished" is the term she uses. Using her own, rapidly dissipating funds, she paid \$600 for him. This was enough to buy a couple of months of board and feed, unless, that is, the ten-year-old needed vet care, which most ex-racehorses seem to much of the time.

After I toured her barn down in the Tijuana River Valley, Groebli chauffeured me through the winding roads of East County to Saddlehorn Ranch West in Jamul. There she leases another couple of acres, oakstudded hillsides where her horses roam in the strong East County sun. The last stop was Groebli's own 2.5-acre spread, also in Jamul, where she lives cheekby-jowl with four more Thoroughbreds. One of them is a descendant of Secretariat; he never won a race but he does have Big Red's telltale

ruddiness.

I asked Groebli what sorts of trainers were more (or less) likely to be implicated in leading a racehorse to slaughter. She replied that you won't find bigname trainers like Bob Baffert connected, even peripherally, to the dark side of the back side. However, smaller barns that can ill afford

cynical acknowledge that the industry has cracked down bigtime on horsemen who would steer their charges to a kill buyer. Magna Entertainment, the biggest player of all, has implemented a stringent ban on owners and trainers found to have involvement in

2008, a group of 40 broodmares slipped through the proverbial cracks, though they were saved just before the finish line. It happened when Ben Warren, who runs a large breeding operation in Hemet, and whose horses can be found at Del Mar (as well as Hollywood Park and Santa Anita) gave the horses away to what (he says) he believed to be "good homes"; the recipient was a man identified as Dave Ouinn. The mares ended up on a ranch in Phoenix, destined, allege some, for auction and eventually a Mexican slaughterhouse. Before the animals could be offered up to kill buyers, Priscilla Clark of Tranquility Farm, a prominent horse-retirement facility in Tehachapi, intervened and bought the horses. Warren, who denied culpability, was never charged with a crime.

When it comes to the slaughter of Thoroughbreds, Clark, who owns and manages Tranquility, minces no words. "I've seen the most dastardly things, the most flagrant abuse. Anybody can see it. It's not hidden at night, underground with troglodytes. It's done in front of God and everyone. It's an entrenched system. There are people who troll the track whose service is to remove unwanted horses. They're dealers."

Clark, whose 100plus racing retirees include stars such as Buddy Gil, Geronimo, and Lenny from Malibu, alleges that racehorse slaughter has not declined. "The owners, the trainers, the racetrack operators — many are in denial."

She quips: "It's 'Don't ask, don't tell.' 'Out of sight, out of mind.'"

Moreover, Clark notes, passing a law isn't tantamount to enforcing it; since the enactment of California's horse-slaughter ban over a decade ago, there's never been a prosecution.

Others in racing disagree with this assessment. Melody Conlon, a trainer since 1997, says that, due to heightened awareness among Thoroughbred owners, the one-way trip to the kill buyer is no longer a retirement option in the major Southern California racing circuit. The horses one sees at Del Mar (and Hollywood Park and Santa Anita) are so closely monitored that there's little chance they'll end up in a Canadian or Mexican processing plant. (The

last American horse slaughterhouses were shuttered years ago.)

No one with whom I spoke is uniformly critical of the horse-racing industry. Even the most strident — those at the angry, activist end of

the equine-retirement movement - are generous with praise for owners who give more than a damn. Patricia Clark says, "There are wealthy people who have been absolutely heroic, people like Madeline Auerbach; the Ammermans; Gary Biszants; Ann and Jerry Moss; Valerie Naify; the Rathers; the Siegels. They've given much more than their fair share. And CARMA has been a lifesaver."

Every racehorserescue advocate says the same thing: funding is the key. To that end, a group of local ranches, veterinary practices, and others formed the San Diego Equine Safety Net Coalition in January 2010. Along with Groebli's operation, the county's equine refuges include Blue Apple Ranch in

Ramona, FalconRidge Equine Rescue in Valley Center, and Horses of Tir Na Gog near Pine Valley.

Given the existence of horse-rescue operanotes that, during the past four or five years, each breeding season (January through June) has seen a 20 percent or greater decline in foals from the prior season.

tions, one might think there's an oversupply of Thoroughbred racehorses; but it's not that simple. Madeline Auerbach says that, when the economy slumps, the horse-racing industry — as entertainment — is impacted hard. She

As the result of the recent horse shortage at California Thoroughbred venues, track operators have been forced to reduce field



size and/or cut racing days from the calendar. Take Del Mar, for example. The boutique summer meet had for decades consisted of a 43-day calendar, with only Tuesdays dark, but beginning in 2010, Del Mar (formally, the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club) has operated sans Mondays - except for Labor Day — conducting 37 days of racing.

Even if the meet's shorter nowadays, Del Mar continues to get high marks from every stripe of Thoroughbred enthusiast, including trainers, who are arguably the most important two-legged animals on the grounds. For a trainer's perspective on a Thoroughbred's golden years, I looked up Bruce Headley, an old-time horseman with a 46-horse stable headquartered at Santa Anita. Dubbed "Cowboy Bruce" by talking heads at Television Games Network (TVG), he's been characterized by other horse-racing types as a traditionalist who brings horses along patiently and treats his charges with ample respect.

Headley said, "I've been in the game since 1948. I took out my trainer's license in 1959."

I asked him if he knew anything about the new guys, the younger trainers. Had he heard anything about how they handle the horses on their way out? With nary a trace of rancor, Headley expounded. "I treat my horses right. As far as the other trainers, I don't know: I don't talk to them. They're smart guys. They're bartenders and lawyers. They're linemen for the county,

like Doug O'Neill. They can pass the trainer's exam - it's mostly about drugs and regulations. But they don't know how to ride a horse or saddle a horse. They don't know how to shoe or trim hooves. When I was coming up, I did everything myself. These days, they just hire out. They don't ask for advice, and I don't give any. I just do my own thing. But I don't think abuse and slaughter are a big deal these

days."

Consistent with his role as a rugged remnant, Headley, when it comes to moving Thoroughbreds off the track, blazes his own trail. "I don't go in for the CARMA setup where they take part of the purse. I just find good homes for my horses myself, and it's always worked out well. If somebody needs a good jumper or a pleasure horse, my horses are real well broken. I let

'em down slowly after they come off the track, so they're pretty nice to ride."

I asked Madeline Auerbach and the others about the different sorts of retirement available to Thoroughbreds.

Perhaps best known is the prominent role that ex-racehorses play in the local horseshow world. Under the auspices of groups such as the Greater San Diego Hunter Jumper Association, retrained horses, outfitted with English tack and usually piloted by preteen and teenage girls (along with a smattering of boys and adults) go on to ribbonwinning careers. You'll find "old" racehorses, some well into their teens themselves, at venues such as Del Mar Horse Park.

Then there's the Western side of the equestrian scene: out in the corrals and arenas of Lakeside and Ramona, Thoroughbreds can be seen alongside quarter horses used as reining and cutting horses and barrel-racers. Still others are exported to Canada to work in four-horse teams in chuck-wagon races, while a handful of the smaller, well-bred

mucking stalls.

But perhaps the largest contingent of local retired racehorses end up as simple pleasure horses, ambling along the trails of Poway and a dozen other

types can be found on the polo fields of Rancho Santa Fe. These days, former racers may find homes as therapy horses for autistic kids, mentally disabled adults, and the like. There are even prison programs in which inmates are said to learn empathy via picking hooves and horse-centric exurbs; some, including the old and broken down, find owners who want nothing more than to have what Auerbach calls a "lawn ornament," whose only responsibilities are to nuzzle noses and keep the Bermuda grass in check.

Although the San Diego Union labeled her "a subversive living under cover" and reactionary state senator Jack Tenney had called her a "parasitic menace" in deportation proceedings, Moreno made the inflammatory remarks, now known as the "Caravan of Sorrow" speech.

"[Latino workers] are not aliens," she concluded. "They have contributed



baited labor leaders, including San Diego's Roberto Galvan, Moreno and Bemis were forced to leave the United States.

She came to San Diego in 1937. At age 31, she had a national reputation as a champion of workers' rights, especially for women. Her motto: "One person can't do anything; it's only with others that things are accomplished."

In 1935, after five years as a junior organizer in New York, she left her first husband and went to Florida with her daughter Mytyl. The American Federation of Labor (AFL) hired her to organize Latino, African-American, and Italian cigar workers in plants at Ybor City, Lakeland, and Jacksonville. But why a woman — a Latina, at that — in such a maledominated milieu?

"The Ku Klux Klan," writes Vicki L. Ruiz, "had a reputation for terrorizing labor activists and other progressives, which is one reason why the AFL was afraid of Florida. While [Moreno's] bosses no doubt recognized her talent, they also considered her young, green, and expendable."

Outside the plants, and at union hall meetings, Moreno listened as much as she spoke. Rather than offer a blanket solution, little attention to Latinas. In Florida she produced a solid contract with 13,000 employees. The Klan was not a problem; the AFL was. The negotiations favored labor, said the higher-ups; water them down for management. On hearing the news,

she asked workers: "What are your problems?" And when she gave a speech, witnesses agree, she was "forceful," with a "talent for persuasion." These skills surprised many because in private she was proper, soft-spoken, almost compulsively reserved. She rarely talked about herself and always looked fresh from the hairdresser's.

She left New York, she said, because unions paid

Moreno urged workers to reject the counter-proposal. For her efforts, the AFL transferred her to Pennsylvania. After numerous frustrations, she resigned in 1937, joined the Congress of Industrial Organizations (CIO), and moved to San Diego.

In later years, Moreno swore she'd never eat canned food. She knew, writes Vicki Ruiz, "the conditions under which produce was processed."

During the Depression, most women were paid "piece work," by the number of cans they filled (or burlap sacks in the fields). "The faster we packed," said Katie Asaro, who worked at the Van Camp Cannery in San Diego, "the more trays we packed, the more money we made."

Even with no fish on the conveyor belts, women still had to be at Van Camp's by sunup on their own time. They were also on call, "ready to run to work whenever tuna boats arrived at the wharves." When several came in, says Asaro, "the cannery would be flooded with fish" that had to be gutted (by males) and put on a large wooden tray for cooking. A conveyor belt then took the cooling meat to 60-foot-long cleaning tables, where women removed scales and bones, then on to tables where others packed the white meat into cans.

During peak periods, a crane heaped tons of tuna into a 100-yard flume down to the cannery (after a 24-hour walkout at Van Camp in 1937, employees had to pack 160 tons). Van Camp and other canneries went on "speed up": workers did the same tasks double- and sometimes triple-time, for the same pay. They were on their feet all day. Accidents, in sweatshop conditions, were rife.

"If a worker cut her finger slightly while paring or canning," says Moreno, "[she was] reluctant to take time to have it bandaged simply because she feared falling behind under the piece-rate scale." Fingers became infected; some even lost. The women — The bosses always wanted us to work faster and faster, and if we didn't, we were fired." Checkers with clipboards kept score.

In 1937, Moreno began organizing the packing houses and canneries along the San Diego waterfront. She made inroads at the Ortega Chili plant and, working with Roberto Galvan, organized workers at tuna canneries in fish-

as much out of pride as fear of falling behind — took more chances. Urged on by supervisors, they moved quicker on floors slippery with fish gurry. They had five minutes, in the morning and the afternoon, to use a "filthy" restroom, and labored until the last fish was processed.

"We worked 14 to 16 hours a day on piece-work rates," remembered Inez Caerno, "[which] were cut every time we began to make enough to live on. streaked aprons and high boots.

Always on the move, Galvan "ran a labor union from a hotel room," writes Carlos Larralde," because he "faced regular threats from the Klan." In one instance, the San Diego chapter put a stick of dynamite in his car. Galvan's motto: "I do not believe in imperfection. I believe in improvement."

Moreno and Galvan organized on San Diego's Cannery Row, from the



foot of F Street to 26th, especially at Van Camp Sea Food, Old Mission Packing Corporation, and the San Diego Packing Company. In 1939, they established Local 64 of United Cannery, Agricultural, and Allied Workers of America at Van Camp. A year later, an agreement created a closed shop, seniority rights, eight-hour days (with extra pay for work over eight hours, plus time and a half on holidays and Sundays). By 1942, Local 64's predominately Latino workers boasted the highest wages in the packing industry. Historian Carey McWilliams called United Cannery "the most progressive, best organized, most intelligently led CIO movement in the country." Along with admit-

Along with admitting all races, creeds, and genders, the organization defined itself as a "democratic trade union": locals operated apart from national or state office interference, which served in advisory capacities. President John Tisa: "Democracy meant the right of the workers... to elect their own leadership, to conduct their own affairs."

In effect, writes Vicki Ruiz, "power flowed from below."

In 1939, Moreno and Galvan attempted to organize the Old Mission Packing Company, which canned chili peppers, olives, and pimentos and paid workers between 15 and 20 cents an hour. Their results, unlike at Van Camp, were mixed. And in 1948, Old Mission Packing, San Diego Packing, and, some say, Van Camp, would enact their revenge.

Throughout her travels, Moreno raised the possibility of a national convention. She helped organize El Congreso de Pueblos Se Hablan Española — the first civil-rights congress for Latinos — in Los Angeles, April 28–30 in 1939. Along with demanding desegregation of public facilities (restrooms, swimming pools), housing, education, and employment, the congress made specific demands (prisoners in San Quentin being allowed to exchange letters with their families in Spanish) and a radical one: it rejected assimilation. It "went so far," writes David G. Gutierrez, "as to demand recognition of a bilingual-bicultural society that already existed in fact.... Americans would have to start living up to the democratic principles they claimed to represent."

Working with Josefina Fierro, Moreno established a women's platform for the Southern California chapter. Fierro: "No, we didn't have a Lib Movement so we didn't think in terms of what women's roles were — we just did it and it worked."

The organization didn't last the war but, Fierro stressed, "for the first time Mexican and Spanish American people have gathered together for unified action against the abuses of discrimination and poverty."

"Luisa Moreno" was her professional name. and public shield. Until the end of World War II, she permitted herself little time for a private life as "Rosa," which close friends called her, or even time for daughter Mytyl. "I had a choice," Moreno said. "I could organize cannery workers, or I could control my teenage daughter. I chose to organize cannery workers, and my daughter never forgave me." (She did, but many years later).

Moreno's first husband was abusive; her second lasted only a short while. In 1945, encouraged by a friend to "have some fun for once" at a V-J Day celebration in San Francisco, Moreno danced with a naval officer she recognized from long ago. When she dared to ask, "How's your wife?" Gray Bemis said he was getting a divorce. Seventeen months later, Moreno became Mrs. Rosa Rodriguez de Bemis.

They moved to San Diego in 1947. In 1948, identified as a troublemaker by local canneries, Moreno faced questions by the newly formed House Un-American Activities Committee in a hearing at the Civic Center. The state committee, led by senator John Tenney, labeled her a "card-carrying Communist" (she'd quit the party in 1935) and an "agent of Soviet intrigue."

"The government's action appears to be linked," wrote journalist Steve Murdock, "to a



whole series of deportation actions against union leaders on the Pacific Coast, particularly...in the agricultural and foodprocessing industry."

In March 1949, the U.S. Immigration Office changed her status: Moreno, now a "dangerous alien," faced deportation. As she awaited an appeal, write Larralde and del Castillo, Moreno's "life was shattered." The house may have been bugged (so she turned the radio up), FBI agents investigated friends and neighbors, and she feared exile, if not worse.

Violent phone calls and verbal threats — many from "patriotic" organizations — forced Moreno and Bemis to leave Encanto and move downtown to Sixth Street. Before they left, they burned stacks of documents that might incriminate colleagues.

Bills piled up. Money ran out. Threats persisted. Then the FBI offered a way out: Moreno could become an American citizen. All she had to do was testify against Harry Bridges, former longshoreman and internationally renowned trade unionist. Moreno refused. She could never be "a free woman with a mortgaged soul."

"They can deport me," she wrote in 1950, "but they can never deport the people that I've worked with and with whom things were accomplished for the benefit of hundreds of thousands of workers... things that can never be destroyed."

In early November 1950, police arrested Moreno and detained her at Terminal Island Federal Prison in Los Angeles harbor. Days after release, she and Bemis drove to El Paso in a Studebaker. On November 30, they crossed the border, never to return.

ous - part of the American economy. You can read today that the late, great American diplomat and historian George F. Kennan said during the cold war that "Were the Soviet Union to sink tomorrow under the waters of the ocean, the American military-industrial establishment would have to go on, substantially unchanged, until some other adversary could be invented." Many consider that prescient, indeed.

Once again, publications are quoting former president Dwight D. Eisenhower's warning about the military-industrial complex, along with his lesser-recited statement, "Every gun that is made, every warship launched, every rocket fired signifies, in the final sense, a theft from those who hunger and are not fed." Eisenhower, a retired general, was a moderate Republican.

Republican Robert Gates, who just retired as defense secretary, said this year, "Given America's difficult economic circumstances

and parlous fiscal condition, military spending on things large and small can and should expect closer and harsher scrutiny."

Gates, a longtime cold warrior, laments the state of affairs. He wants America to throw its weight around — one reason he may have departed. But, says Cox, "Gates is saying that in the old days we were able to support a lot more military activity because the economy could afford it. That is changing. With our eroding economic base, we can no longer support these defense

expenditures." A study published this spring by the San Diego Military Advisory Council indicates that with the ripple effect (events in one industry spreading out to other industries), military spending in San Diego in 2009 generated \$30.5 billion of economic impact and generated 354,627 jobs, or 26 percent of regional employment. This year, the economic impact should be \$34.7 billion, while military-generated jobs grow to 385,391.

Direct spending grew by 10.1 percent in 2007, 14.1 percent in 2008, and 12.3 percent in 2009, according to the report. That was impressive growth in some bad years. Growth for 2010 and 2011 is projected at 5 and 3.5 percent, respectively. Kelly Cunningham, economist for the National University System Institute for Policy Research, notes that San Diego County personal income dropped 1.1 percent in recessionary 2008 and 2009, compared with a national decline of 1.8 percent. San Diego's smaller drop resulted from a \$1.9 billion jump in federal payrolls, \$1.5 billion of which was military.

Had federal and military pay remained constant, along with other transfer payments (Social Security, unemployment compensation, welfare, etc.), San Diego's personal income

would have plunged 3.1 percent; that would have been one of the worst performances in the nation.

A big rise in military pay has helped. According to the U.S. Department of Commerce, the number of active duty troops in San Diego only rose from 109,800 in 2001 to 112,000 in 2009. However, compensation leaped 97 percent during the period, 53 percent adjusted for inflation, says Cunningham.

According to the San Diego Military Advisory Council, 58.4 percent of direct military spending in San Diego comes from procurement, such as manufacture of equipment. Active duty salaries are 26.8 percent, retirement and veterans' benefits 8.9 percent, and civilian salaries 5.4 percent.

Just as with pro sports, the arts, and redevelopment promoters begging for government handouts, the ripple effect can be exaggerated, consciously or unconsciously. Still, says Cunningham, "When you are dependent on one customer, vou are dependent on their whims or decisions. It's better to have more diversification."

Of course, arms conversion, if there is any, doesn't have to hurt San Diego. "It's possible we could benefit," says Cox. "The military is moving from the East Coast to the West Coast. Secondly, we have a heavy concentration of Marines, and they tend to be disproportionately less impacted by cutbacks."

Any conversion process will likely be slow, giving metro areas such as San Diego time to adjust. And there will be plenty of political haggling that could considerably water down any efforts. Still, San Diego is doing the right thing by preparing for any eventuality. The problem is that nobody knows quite what form conversion might take, and the decisions will be made elsewhere.

## Thief does homework

Winters climbed up into the crawl space. He found a black backpack, a mask, and a gun. The semiautomatic handgun was later identified as an "airsoft gun" and as a Powerline 159 pistol. The scattered jewelry included set pieces and loose stones. When Winters crawled out onto the rooftop, he found more jewelry and empty boxes around the rim of the hole.

There were 11 video cameras in operation at Phil Mulloy's jewelry shop. They caught the robbery from all angles. The video confirmed that the robber came out of the women's bathroom.

Nearly all the valuable jewelry was put into the safe at night. Around the safe were multiple infrared motion detectors, which were connected to an alarm system. A technician was called to double-check the alarm system. This technician showed Phil Mulloy the wiring in the crawl space above the ladies' restroom where someone had disabled the alarm.

Mulloy examined the ceiling in his shop. Too late he noticed the small, carefully cut hole directly above his safe. The opening was about one inch by four inches. He wondered if somebody had watched from the crawl space to see what time the safe was opened.

Mulloy said his cost for the 20 pieces of jewelry stolen on October 21, 2009, was \$84,724.

#### The Marquise-Cut Diamond

Three weeks later, on November 12, a tall, slender man walked into a Vista pawnshop. The elegantly dressed and well-spoken customer had an unusually

high-quality diamond. "He wanted to see how much we would buy the diamond for," said Jason Postelnek, the pawnshop employee who is a diamond grader certified by the Gemological Institute of America. Postelnek remembered the half-carat, marquise-cut diamond because it was of rare quality. "It was brought in as a loose gemstone."

Postelnek graded the sparkly rock VS1 for clarity (about midway on the grading scale) and F for color (on a scale of D to Z, with D being the best clarity). The pawnshop did not offer enough money to interest the man in selling the stone; instead, he decided to take a \$175 loan. The man filled out the paperwork, identifying himself as John Leslie Davis Sr., 51; then he pressed his inked thumb on the pawnshop form and left his diamond at the shop.

This marquise-cut diamond might have been taken from a platinum ring stolen from his store, Mulloy said. A missing ring had multiple marguise and baguette diamonds. Mulloy said he paid \$2365 for it.

#### **The DNA Match**

Investigators collected DNA from the mask and pistol abandoned at the crime scene. The DNA

profile was entered into the Combined DNA Index System run by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The name that came up was John Leslie Davis Sr. His DNA profile was in the system because he is a previously convicted felon.

Detective Patrick Preston said that Carlsbad police learned Davis's name in January 2010 and put him under surveillance for a while. On February 5, officers stopped the red 1998 GMC truck that Davis was driving and arrested him. Inside the truck, in the driver's-side door, they found a headbandmounted flashlight, useful in dark crawl spaces. A black velvet jeweler's bag with drawstring closure was tucked into the driver's-side visor. They also found black cloth gloves and a pawn slip.

Officers swabbed Davis's mouth to confirm the DNA match.

Davis was charged with two counts of robbery. He posted \$145,000 bail, paying a premium of \$14,500 to a bail bondsman, and got out of jail two days after he was arraigned. He was free on bail for more than a year before his trial began this May.

**Fond of Diamonds** 

A lifelong affection for diamonds and a disposition to take things that don't belong to him made John Leslie Davis Sr. a multiconvicted felon. His court records show convictions starting in 1979, when Davis was 21 years old, for the nighttime burglary of a North County shop called Dutch's Jewelers.

In 1981, he pleaded guilty to one charge of grand theft. Three other charges - burglary, attempted burglary, and attempted robbery - were dropped. He was sentenced to 270 days in jail and probation.

In 1983, Davis accumulated a string of nine burglary charges.

A defense attorney working for Davis in 1983 remarked in court paperwork that the nine counts of burglary were all "burglary of businesses when said businesses were not open for business."

Davis got 12 years in prison this time. But at the same hearing in which Davis was sentenced, the judge ordered that he should get his diamonds back. The court order reads: "TO THE CHIEF

OF THE OCEANSIDE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND Detective Teotter of the Oceanside police Department: You are hereby ordered to return to the property of Defendant JOHN LESLIE DAVIS the personal property of said defendant taken from defendant or/and vehicle at time of his arrest including but not limited to the following: one (1) ring with three diamonds; one earring with one 35 pts diamond; one diamond (45 pts marquis cut); one diamond (30 pts, oval shape); one chain (gold) with religious medal; one watch with diamond chips for hours." The order is signed by the Honorable Suzanne Knauf, judge of the superior court.

#### **Holes in Roofs**

"He did this exact style of robbery before," prosecutor Melissa Vasel told the jury in May of this year. The practiced thief has at least four strike priors for separate robbery and burglary convictions in San Diego and Orange counties, the prosecutor said.

In 1993, when Davis was being held in Orange County, Oceanside police detective Chris McDonough drove there to speak with him about cases in San Diego County.

The detective was investigating a series of burglaries and robberies that involved entering through

rooftops. The thief also made a habit of leaving behind items — clothing, gloves, and small bags.

When Detective McDonough spoke to the suspect, Davis at first denied his involvement but then admitted complicity.

In a robbery of a Pep Boys, Davis said he had cased the place to see how the alarm system was set up and he'd watched the store in the early morning hours to see what time the manager arrived. He had set off the alarm and waited across the street to see if police came. They did. Davis said he went back the next morning and robbed the place. Inside the store, he confronted the manager with a gun, ordered the man to open the safe, and reached in to grab a bundle of money off the top. Pep Boys suffered a \$6500 loss. Davis left his gun and some clothing at the scene of the crime. "He did say that he always did that," said Detective McDonough. "He said he left a black tote bag behind."

"He told me he had a background in construction," McDonough said. The burglar said that he was familiar with the construction of buildings and security systems.

In a similar robbery of

a check-cashing business, during which the thief came in through the roof, Davis got away with \$13,000 cash, McDonough said.

Then there was the burglary of a gun shop, in which thieves came in through the roof to steal guns over a two-day period. The detective said Davis admitted to scouting the place, learning the security system, and carving a hole in the roof of the gun shop. But Davis told the detective that he did all this at the request of others, who actually stole the guns. Davis claimed he never went inside the gun shop, although he said he gave advice to the thieves. The perps got away with "a lot of guns," according to McDonough.

In late 1993, Davis was convicted in Orange County of second-degree robbery.

In 2000, Davis pleaded guilty to two counts of robbery in San Diego County and was sentenced to two years in prison.

Davis is now 53 years old. At the close of trial in May, he was found guilty of the armed robbery at Mulloys jewelry store in 2009. He was immediately cuffed and taken into custody.

On June 28, the Honor-

#### **Kidnapped and** Killed

**Mexicali Sex Workers Establish Safety** Guidelines

Baja — So far this year, eight prostitutes have been murdered in Mexicali, and according to Carlos Martínez Vieyra, president of Unidos en Apoyo a **Grupos Vulnerables ("United** in Support of Vulnerable Groups"), 16 "sexoservidoras" are still missing from 2010

At a recent group meeting, 40 prostitutes exchanged information and established safety rules, such as not getting into clients' cars and not going to hotels on the outskirts of town. The group wants to keep the action in the traditional area of practice — "la primera quadra" (the first block) of Mexicali, where the bars and cabarets have long been established.

According to Martínez, the police are searching for an individual or group that has been torturing and murdering ladies of the night. The most recently murdered woman was found last week floating in a canal, her genitals disfigured.

"We don't want Mexicali to turn into another Ciudad Juárez," Martínez said in an interview, noting that the disappeared females there

have included women working in maguiladoras.

One of the suspects used a firearm to get his victim to submit, and last week a young girl was kidnapped off the streets but managed to escape. Martínez pointed out that some 280 women work as sexoservidoras in the first block of the city, an area on which police can keep an eye.

#### No Tragedy

Lyric Opera Poised to Sell **North Park Theatre** *North Park* — Lyric Opera, which owns Birch North Park Theatre, struggles to pay the mortgage and operating costs, which run more than \$50,000 monthly. Now, the nonprofit organization is close to unloading the property.

In a July 6 phone interview, Lyric Opera general director Leon Natker said he has "two offers still active," one from Los Angeles and one from New York. The asking price is around \$5 million, but he expects counter-offers.

Natker said he still sees a good future for Lyric Opera. The "biggest show of our season," he said, is "The Mikado." He didn't mention it, but Natker is playing the lead role.



#### Baja Revisited By Brandon Walter

Recently, a friend and I embarked on a two-week-long road trip that took us from San Diego to Cabo San Lucas, the tip of Baja California, Mexico.

We'd been discussing such a trip for weeks. We fantasized about the uncrowded waves we would score and delicious seafood we would eat in abundance. The two of us recounted several stories from past trips we had taken in Mexico and about how great those experiences had been. Stories about laid-back locals, uncrowded surf, and hanging out on the beach sipping on cold *cervezas*. Despite all the good times we'd had in Baja the past, we were apprehensive to take such a trip. After all, living in San Diego, there's no shortage of horror stories about what happens in Mexico: everything from tales of bribery and drugs being planted on tourists to stories about decapitations and how children's freshly killed carcasses are used to smuggle drugs across the border.

So, after serious consideration on

driving into Baja, which neither of us had done in at least four years, I began to do some research, mostly reading articles and threads on online forums. What I found out did not surprise me; however, it did enlighten the subject. Here are a few key points that I found reassuring:

First, the majority of cartel-related crime takes place in the border cities. This meant as soon as we were out of TJ we would be fine.

Second, among those crimes, those involved almost always were either members of the cartels, government officials, or family members of either. Good for us we don't fall into any of those groups.

Third, and probably the most astonishing (or not), is that the American media overdramatizes what's taking place in Mexico. The stretching of facts and the lack of journalistic integrity do not portray an accurate picture of the situation there. Furthermore, both the *L.A Times* and the *Union-Tribune* are notorious for reprinting old stories and embellishing the truth about cartel-related news.

So, after much thought we decided to go for it. We loaded up my buddy's old Volkswagen Vanagon with surfboards and camping supplies. We bought our Mexican insurance and picked up our recommended tourist visas.

The trip was nothing short of awesome — aside from some pretty brutal *topes* and the starter dying in the van, we encountered no problems. We did not even have to bribe any cops. I felt totally safe the whole trip. Our van was searched several times (pretty much at every checkpoint); this is simply protocol, as the government is actually trying to do something about the cartels. The *federales* were kind, happy people to deal with, and it was actually a nice break to get out, stretch your legs, and talk to someone else.

The roads were not perfect but really not bad at all. They're currently being upgraded to a four-lane system. Completion is expected sometime in 2013, and the progress can best be seen between La Paz and Todos Santos that highway is as good as anything in the States.

We had a great trip and did exactly what we had planned: we surfed uncrowded waves, ate plenty of amazing seafood, and drank a few *cervezas*. We were happy to spend our tourist dollars in a well-deserving place.

But this article isn't about how you should go to Baja and spend a little time and money — even though you should.

The point is that anywhere you go in the world, whether it be Mexico, Paris, or just down the street, you should always be mindful of possible dangers. And, second, learn to think critically — don't always take someone else's word as the end-all truth. Go out and find your own truth!

#### **Carlsbad Caverns, New** Mexico **By Ruth Newell**

Carlsbad Caverns National Park lies within the limestone Guadalupe Mountain range — the world's best-preserved Permian-age fossil reef — in what was a shallow inland sea some 240-plus million years ago.

I talked my friend into going in through the natural entrance, which gives the visitor an idea of what it might have been like for Jim White, who first stumbled into the cave in 1898. Leaving the visitors' center, we followed the trail down behind the parking lot and past the Bat Flight Amphitheater.

We'd hoped to see the exodus that evening but were told at the ticket booth that the 400,000 bats had not yet returned from Mexico. Once past the amphitheater, the trail dips, beginning its one-anda-quarter-mile descent into the earth.

After entering the natural entrance of the cave, it took us an hour on steep but paved switchbacks to arrive in the Big Room — the equivalent of almost 79 stories below the surface. We strolled around the trail slowly, letting groups of students pass.

We then stopped and sat to take in the essence of the place. Looking up 350 feet, we felt like kids staring up at the ceiling paintings of a great cathedral. At 56°F year round, we'd worn our fleece jackets, but after a while of not moving the dampness seeped into our bones.

Carlsbad is home to some of the world's largest and longest limestone caves, which, unlike other caves around the globe, were carved out by sulfuric acid instead of water. And Carlsbad Caverns, one of the youngest of all the caves formed, is but a single cave within a larger 117-cave system that continues to grow as new ones are discovered.

The seventh-largest underground chamber in the world was discovered by Jim White, a 16-year-old apprentice cowboy who was looking for strays; he stumbled upon the mouth of the cave

after seeing a plume of bats fly into the evening skies.

Sitting there listening to the dripping, we became aware that this place was still in the making: stalactites, soda straws, draperies, and ribbons

continue to grow. Airfield-size rooms adorned with totem poles, flowstone, rimstone dams, lily pads, shelves, cave pools, and stalagmites continue to form drip by drip, day by day, year after year.

Edwin Arlington Robinson (1865–1935) grew up in Gardiner, Maine, a town that became the model for the mythical Tilbury Town in which many of the fictional characters in his poetry lived and died. His first two books were self-published with the financial help of some friends, but did not procure for the poet a large readership. His fortunes changed when Kermit Roosevelt gave The

Children of the Night, Robinson's second collection of poetry, to his father, president Theodore Roosevelt. In 1905, learning that the author was impoverished, Roosevelt, who greatly admired the poems, secured *Robinson a position in the New York Customs Office — a position* designed to be as easy as possible so that Robinson could devote his time to his real work, his poetry. With the publication of his next several books, Robinson's poetry became well known and much admired and he went on to win the Pulitzer Prize three times. Edwin, who had been in love with the young woman who married his brother Herman, remained unmarried throughout his life. Many of his poems remain cherished parts of the American literary canon, and certainly "Richard Cory" is among the best known and loved of those poems. It is from E. A. Robinson's 1897 self-published collection, The Children of the Night, which has recently been republished by ValdeBooks.

## **R.I.P.: Red Velvet**

On June 4, I awoke to an otherwise awesome Saturday, fired up the ol' email, and clicked open a message from one of San Diego's finest local chefs. What I saw horrified me. One of my favorite spots in San Diego was closing its doors...*later that night!* My first selfish thought was, *Great, not even enough time to head over to get one more bite* 

of some of the best, most current, tastiest, and beautifully plated dishes in the entire city. After emailing the chef for deets about the closing, my dismay conjured

up questions I had no answers for, but plenty of opinions about.

Why did Red Velvet Wine Bar in Little Italy fail?

The official line is that Red Velvet's sommelier and general manager quit within the same week, and rather than rebuild her staff from scratch,

owner Wendy Segal decided to scrap the restaurant at the base of the building bearing her name. Yet the bottom line is this: no one would let the annoyance of an employee search drive them to board up a successful business. So, it's a given that things were going less than optimally, and it's probably because the business model wasn't set up to succeed.

Everything about the restaurant seemed too good to be true, except the prices. At over \$100,

having one of Chef Luke Johnson's exquisitely unique tasting menus (which changed weekly) was an expensive proposition, even though most tasting menus at

upscale spots in town are around \$100, without wine, and even though Red Velvet's came with seven generous pours of wines or seven *bottles* of beer. Johnson's food was extremely labor-intensive, especially considering he worked in a cracker box of a kitchen, and all of it was dished up *à la minute*.

For a space that seats about 20, where the main draw is having a glass or two of vino — food being a bit of an afterthought — making enough money nightly to afford such a good chef and high-end ingredients, and to justify Johnson's toiling, was a pie-in-the-sky notion. In fact, the whole concept — a smallish room where guests order as the whim hits them, have a dish prepared on the spot, delivered and explained by the chef — while certainly a dream for diners, isn't feasible or sustainable for a business.

Red Velvet always came across as somebody's lofty, unrealistic vision brought to life, more of can-I-do-this deal than a should-I-do-this decision that had been sufficiently scrutinized for profitability and long-term success. I always felt I was getting in on something that wouldn't be around forever, and as much as I love being right, I hate that I was in this case.

Where will Chef Johnson end up next? I have no idea but can only hope it's some-

where in San Diego. Anything edible this guy touches turns to gold, and any venue that employs him will be lucky to get him. Even in a more structured

environment, he's sure to excel, making food people will be ecstatic to get their mouths around. Johnson is a master of attaining proper balance and texture, of plating food that looks like artwork you almost feel guilty about tearing to pieces with your utensils — despite the incredible payoff. It sounds like I'm exag-

gerating, but the cuisine at Red Velvet was killer, and that's something every food writer in San Diego agreed on. That just about *never* happens and drives home how good Johnson is. Right

now, he's the hottest cordon bleu chip on the market, and with any luck, his next steps won't beat a path out of town. That would be the big-



gest food travesty to befall San Diego in a long time.

Why can't places like this, featuring immensely talented toques and food that's a cut above what we typically find in San Diego, last long in my hometown?

Well, on top of unrealistic business planning and execution, I fear that, even with the

strides we've made as a dining city, our palates aren't ready to want, much less *demand* cuisinally heightened fare and places that specialize in it, like

Red Velvet. I'll concede that Red Velvet didn't do much to get their name out there (they did employ a PR agency and received some press, but they were always a best-kept-secrettype place on a side street off of Little Italy's main drag). But in top-tier dining cities, foodies do the legwork to find the next big thing or, after learning of it, venturing out to give it a shot. That's not our mindset in laid-back San Diego.

I'm confident we will evolve into one of America's top ten-food metropolises. I'll even take things a step further: most people would be hardpressed to name a more diningdense burg outside of NYC, San Francisco, L.A., Chicago, Las Vegas, New Orleans, Napa, or Seattle — and I'm willing to toss down the gauntlet and say we vie for one of those two remaining spots. We have the best Mexican food and craft beer in the country, a five-star/ five-diamond spot in Addison at the Grand Del Mar, dozens of fantastic upscale restaurants, culturally focused eateries, and original items like fish tacos.

It's just that nobody outside San Diego knows how good we are and how far we've come of late, because when tourists visit, they're either from one of the eight aforementioned cities and have a chip on their shoulder, or they come from someplace lamer than San Diego and proceed to flock to familiar chains and Gaslamp mass-appeal tourist traps without getting even a glimpse of what we have to offer.

Despite this latest setback, I believe in and continue to root for my native county with the fervor of a cheerleader raging with the energy buzz of a massive sugar high. We *will* get there, and I'll be that guy with knife and fork in hand, gobbling up everything in sight with a Kool-Aid Man smile. Keep the faith, San Diego foodies. It's gonna happen. And with any luck, Chef Johnson will continue to be a key contributor to our city's dining evolution.

As we went to press, I received a communiqué from Chef Johnson informing me about his latest venture, a



concept heretofore unseen in San Diego (or just about anywhere), called A Simple Supper. He'll be offering invitation-only communal dining experiences featuring one-time-only menus at locations that change every time. To keep informed and jockey for seats at Johnson's dinner table, check out *asimplesupper.com* and keep abreast of developments via *twitter.com/ asimplesupper.*

## **Slow Down!**

verything here is imported," Kaitlyn says.

"Everything?" I ask. "Everything, except for Ferrila and me."

Ferrila, the other barista, gives a little wave from the strangest espresso machine you ever did see. It's like a silver space capsule for monkeys.

"Oh," says Kaitlyn, "and the food is locovore. We buy our fruit and veggies locally."

Glad to hear that, 'cause in one hand she's holding a square white plate loaded with a scarlet splodge of lasagna — my veggie lasagna. In her other hand, sitting on a triangular plate, is a chunk of baguette cut into slices.

Hey, maybe it's an *Italian* baguette — this is an Italian joint, after all. It was exciting to come across this black-and-gold place about a quarter of an hour ago. It's in a beautiful old two-story Hillcrest building, with a Romeo and Juliet balcony fronting the second floor. Below the balcony, there are two black canvas canopies, and in gold letters and red numbers, the name: "Caffe Vergnano 1882." Very Olde Worlde. Yet, through the window I could see that inside it was *La Dolce Vita* modern: blond



wood, comfy-but-sleek black furniture, that espresso machine, a white, floor-to-ceiling frosted glass wall, backlit with the etched

> "Vergnano" name coming through. You can imagine this in Roma.

So in I came, hoping they'd have something more than Italian coffee on hand at this time of night. It was around 9:00, when most eateries are stacking

chairs on tables.

I sat down at a cool, severely square table. The walls are cream, dark green, and wine red, the red dotted with photos of other Vergnano places in Europe and Canada. The only round things in sight are tall, silver coffee-bean dispensers, and that ginormous espresso machine

from Italy. The guy in charge, Hector, says it's a replica of the world's first espresso machine, from 1917, like a steam locomotive stood up on end.

I got the menu. Whew...prices okay. Panini start at \$7; salads \$7, \$8. More serious stuff's also around \$8. Pollo al Marsala ("Tender slices of chicken breast sautéed in Marsala wine, served with rosemary potatoes and green beans") topped the price list at \$10.50. Of course, Italian coffee's their main deal. It runs from \$1.95 for a "piccolo" espresso, through \$3.50 for a "shakerato" — chilled creamy coffee in a martini glass — to \$4.95 for another cold creamy drink called

a "cremino." No drip coffee. Espresso only. The ladies sprinkle an "1882" stencil in cinnamon onto the fancier drinks.

"That year, 1882," says Hector, "is when Enrico Vergnano started selling coffee, near Turin. Nearly 130 years later, I am their first place in the United States."

But, hey, food. The panini (\$6.95) look good. There's turkey breast with hearts of artichokes and tartar sauce or grilled veggies with brie cheese or prosciutto with mozzarella, tomato, and lettuce. There's a "zuppa verde," vegetable soup of the day, made here, Hector says. And I see a lady eating a salad with tuna and olives a couple tables over — "insalata mista," she says, (\$7.50). It looks pretty filling.

Hector — he's Italian, from Savona, near Turin — tells me they can make anything on the menu, even though we're heading toward closing time, including the "*pasta del giorno*"; it's pesto sauce today (\$7.75). "I make

it myself," he says. "We also have a lasagna *al forno* you might like. It's vegetarian. I put in squash, yellow zucchini, green zucchini, one layer of eggplant, a layer of pasta, a layer of béchamel, tomato on top, parmesan on top of that..."

Love pesto. And the lasagna's more expensive, at \$9.25. But it sounds so warm and inviting, I go for that. When it comes, with heavy cutlery and a black cloth napkin, *fresh* is the word. There's even a slightly crispy panini base. It all makes for luscious, creamy, crunchy chomping. With the slices of baguette, it's more than enough food. I have a glass of water to wash everything down.

Hector comes over. "Like at home?" he asks. I nod. "Better." (Sorry, Carla.)

"Italian men are very particular," he says. "They fight with wives over dinner because their wives never cook exactly like their moms did. It's the same with coffee. If an espresso sits in the cup more than 30 seconds, we throw it away. There are no Starbucks in Italy."

I get an espresso (\$1.95). Ferrila brings it on a black tray with a little flat biscuit and a shot glass of water. Classy.

"Drink that before your coffee," says Hector. "Clear your taste buds." I slurp the water and glug the coffee. Beautiful end.

I ask if he has Wifi here. "People sitting silent, alone with their computers?" he says. "No. We want to be social. Two men came in and started playing backgammon last week. I went over and thanked them, because this is what I want us to be."

Turns out Hector's lucky to be, at all. "Once I had a restaurant in Caracas, Venezuela, with 22 employees. I got robbed. They threw us in our walk-in freezer. We survived. So lucky. One of the employees who hid let us out, after the robbers left. Then, when I was working 16 hours a day for Hilton, I had a stroke, at age 43. And when I was lying there in the hospital, four words came to me: 'It's...not...worth... it.' My wife said, 'Hector, you could return to Italy, Savona, the farm, a cow, and some hens. Slow down!' But I always wanted to have a little Italian coffee shop in the United States. I contacted Vergnano, and one year later, I have it! I'm very happy."

Only thing lacking? A Vespa, to zip me off in style. ■

#### An Imperfect Union with Some Serious Blue Chips!

I'd heard some buzz, but it wasn't until chef Paul McCabe of KITCHEN 1540 leaned over to me at the California Restaurant Association awards and asked, "So, have you been to Union yet?" that I knew I'd need to fire up the ol' autocoach and motor out to Encinitas to see what Highway 101's latest resto addition is all about.

McCabe hadn't been there, but rumors of an early boom for the new biz had trickled south to his kitchen at L'Auberge Del Mar. Earlier today, I lunched there and it appears just about everything I'd heard is correct.

Yes, it's been well received by coastal residents. There was a healthy swell of patrons adding to the jovial ambience at what is one of the most attractive spaces I've come across of the many decked out in today's popular reclaimation-modern motif. Yes, there's a nice selection of craft beer on-tap, much of which (75-85%) is local in nature, but to be fair, mostly everyday varieties that are just as available at a BevMo.

And yes, it's absolutely, positively, pricey. Burgers come in at \$12 and up. Sandwiches follow suit. Still, I indulged in one of each, being sure to ask if fries at least came with them at that price point.

My waitress, who was more than pleasant and highly efficient (like the rest of the staff... definitely something an eatery, especially one this young, can hang their newbie hats on), explained that they come with Kenebunc chips, but fries are available...for a dollar more (huh...are these not all fried potato items?).

I bid farewell to George Washington and splurged for one of the plates. What I got in return were lackluster fries served with a house-made "smoked" ketchup that was in no way smokey and in all ways unappealing due to a watery consistency and a flavor that tasted like granulated sugar and little else.

Take my advice and stick with the chips, which are by far the best thing here. Sprinkled with a liberal amount of house seasoning that's delicious and even a bit spicy, it's a wonder they're the option available at zero markup.

The burger, which was adorned with caramelized onions and Maytag blue cheese (one of my faves), was humble and tasted like a bland, bad, home-made version. The subpar nature of this offering is particularly notable considering Encinitas Ale House, a spot with a better beer list and burgers that are monstrous and ungodly tasty by comparison, is just half a block away.

My beer, a Ballast Point Tongue Buckler, was \$8 steep, but for a double-digit flavor bomb, you can almost overlook it. But \$6 for an under 5% ABV Mucho Aloha Hawaiian-style pale ale? This is highway robbery that can only occur when servicing a clientele that really doesn't know what they're consuming.

It really drives home that

Union is more trend than substance; another spot looking to jump onboard the homey, crafty gastropub bandwagon just as the owners of the spot did when they established their first venture, Pacific Beach Ale House. Craft beer drinkers don't really give much thought to it and, though Union is far better than Generipub Version 1.0, it's unlikely it'll crack its way into SD's caste of standout craft beer establishments either.

That said, if it's a pretty space and killer tater chips you're looking for, you can't do any better. Grab a Kenebunc-style app, then take a walk to Encinitas Ale House for your entrée.

This wealthy desert emirate hosts a businessman well along the way to opening the world's largest caviar farm on the desert — but indoors, in ginormous climate-controlled pools. Oddly enough, the constant warm weather is even better than the Caspian sea for enticing the female sturgeons to make roe. According to the *New York Times*, "from hatchery to harvest, the fish are coddled in the piscine version of fivestar luxury."



they will not give you anything," said Mohamed Abut Awad the plant's production manager. You have to pamper the fish."

It's pretty green. Most wastewater is reused through filtration systems, the rest turned over to the local government for irrigation-use. The tastier parts of the fish are fileted and sold as fish, while the rest (skin, bones, head) is ground into compost for local fertilizer.

This is not going to make caviar an everyday item — it will still be a "special occassion" treat. But perhaps a slightly more frequent treat — say, the anniversary and New Years Eve.

There are already caviar farms in the U.S., France, Italy, Uruguay, and Argentina, among others, but this one is probably on the largest scale yet, perhaps best at helping those increasingly rare sturgeon to recover from the depredations of the caviar-trade. In Abu Dhabi? Seems so.

If the legendary Smitty's BBQ of Lockhart, Texas, were to move here, Phil's BBQ would still win Best BBQ. If Eric Ripert were to branch out from New York, Blue Point would still win Best Seafood (although they are very good — but not as good as the Westgate). And, of course, Indigo Grill is once again "Best Ethnic" (another of Deborah Scott's Cuisinart of ethnicities) competing FIERCELY against Sab-E-Lee, Pho Cao Cali, China Max, Pomegranate, Cafe 21, Costa Brava, et al. No real ethnic food need apply here.

This year, the Cohn Restaurant Group won eight awards, with Melting Point triumphing over Tender Greens (was it even nominated?) as "Best Family/ Casual Chain" and Corvette Diner winning best burger. (Take that, Hodad's!)

Pay attention: David Cohn was for several years the president of the local chapter of the CRA. Best Mexican: Cafe Coyote in Old Town, of course the owner is another present or former head of the organization (who can keep track of who's when?)

Cucina Urbana and other Tracy Borkum eateries also won four awards.

Sbicca's in Del Mar won "best neighborhood." (Is Del Mar a real neighborhood or just an invisibly gated upscale development? Fortunately, it was tied with Ken Grill, just as Island Prime was tied with my choice for a steakhouse, Cowboy Star.)

Best Pacific Rim was the newly-redecorated Bali Hai. I know they've upgraded their decor and menu but...surely there's something else. Maybe Saigon on 5th, or Roppongi, at least.

A few choices were really good: Kitchen 1540 at L'Auberge and Nine Ten tied for best hotel fine dining; Bice tied with Cucina Urbana for best Italian fine dining. But oy-yoy-yoy, best continental-French was Bleu Boheme, recently taken over by Ken Irvine, who's won before for Chez Loma just as the latter restaurant hit its lowest days. (I have tales to tell about bad meals there that I didn't review, but can't tell them in print.)

Why, you may wonder? Why such narrow, grim choices? It's built into the structure of the voting for the CRA choices. First, each restaurant gets one vote. A chain with 11 restaurants like the Cohn Restaurant Group thereby gets 11 votes. Your favorite neighborhood Thai place probably isn't even a member so gets no votes. And then, of course, there's interrestaurant shmoozing. That makes it a popularity contest in the narrower votes.

Then, too, restaurant supply purveyors who join the CRA also get to vote. Sysco (the huge one) also got an award, of sorts. Many restaurants buy stuff like paper towels from Sysco, but the company also sells all manner of foodstuffs. So a restaurant that buys organic produce from Susie's Farm in I.B. and contracts somewhere for recycled napkins is not likely to get any of Sysco's votes.

### **Bourbon**

I used to think bourbon was a man's drink. But after David and I went on that underground bar tour in New York last year, I learned how tasty and versatile the booze could be in the hands of an expert mixologist, such as Chris McMillian of New Orleans.

There aren't too many places in San Diego that can nail a good bourbon blend, but the bars that do aren't messing around.

Small Bar has some great combos, and an extensive selection of bourbon for Manhattan making. Starlite has the Holly Golightly, a Manhattan with a splash of maple liqueur. Quality Social makes a good one, called the Dirty Old Man, with Buffalo Trace bourbon, benedictine, lemon, and peach bitters. It's been off the menu recently, but if you request it, they know what you're talking about.

One of my all-time local faves is the Blue Bulleit that the Tractor Room serves up. I've requested it with Buffalo Trace instead of Bulleit bourbon, but realized it doesn't make that much of a difference, so now I just order it as is. This cocktail contains fresh blueberries, Bulleit bourbon, fresh lemon, and a sugar cube. Oh, and it's

What's rich is, as many times as I've been tearing thru this depot, wondering where da heck to eat, opportunity was knocking, right here.


Double irony: By the time I get up to Walter at the cash register to give my order, a Blue Line hauls in. Dang. Better catch it.

"You have to switch it up a little bit," says Rivera, "to make sure the listeners stick with us."

Callahan's media background includes working as a deejay and production assistant for Makeda Dread at 91X. He also worked at SDSU's KCR campus radio station in 1992. Nug Radio began life months ago in a spare room in his house. The studio moved recently to a Chula Vista office complex, into what was once a medical marijuana evaluation clinic.

"We'd like to see it grow to the point where we don't have to come in every day," says Callahan, "like any other radio station." — Dave Good

Fellow San Diegan Aldair Cerezo plays lead guitar and is joined by bassist Eric Curiel and drummer Cesar Ortiz, both Tijuana natives.

"We take advantage of the San Diego-Tijuana thing," Soltero says. "Up here we are a TJ band. Down there we're a San Diego band. People like it."

Since their first gig last September at El Burro Reyado in Tijuana, Electric Healing Sound has been bringing San Diego bands such as Shiva Trash, Baghdad, and the Last Years to play south of the find trouble. But Revolución and [Calle] Sexta is really chill. There are really good musicians down there, and it's ridiculous that nobody knows about them."

Stringent visa laws aside, Tijuana bands hesitate to play in San Diego because "they feel like they'll get ripped off. There are places in TJ who'll charge cover and won't even give you a free beer. So, we started boycotting those places and playing other venues who give us drinks all night."

"There's a weird thing going on in Mexico," says bassist Eric Curiel. "People get really excited when something from outside happens. That's why we're bringing San Diego bands down there. It keeps it exciting."

"There's a thriving scene

down there," Soltero says. "People are coming to our shows and being inspired. Bands spring up and ask to play. They open doors for us, and that's the only way we will get our scene started. At the Dragon Rojo gig with Shiva Trash, we couldn't even move. I'm looking a guy in the face while singing. They haven't heard music like that in a long time."





rummer Bill Ray has played with dozens of local groups (Tubby, Playground Slap, the Wild Truth), though he's probably best known from Ike Turner's band,

having appeared on the late rocker's Grammy-winning 2006 album Risin' with the Blues.

Ray posts solo drum tracks at BillRayDrums.com, inviting others to download and create their own songs around his beats.

"Neil MacPherson has been creating melodies and lines to some tracks," says Ray. "Smooth-jazz guy Bill Cornish turned in a tune, and Dog Plays Bass from Craigslist sent one along. A guy in Austria sent back a death-metal version to one of my tracks. I'm waiting for the gangsta rappers to start sending me squished, remixed, and tripped-out versions."

He gives away the drum tracks for free. "There's no way anyone can keep a lid on digital media anymore. You might as well go in prepared to give it away and hope that somehow good things come around."

As to his motivation, Ray says, "I'm an artist, and these are my paintings. Use them as you see fit. I draw lines around musical shapes and expect others to color in the parts. Ultimately, they are there for collaborating, songwriting tools, looping, and remixing. The main goal is to get people hooked on my feel during songwriting sessions. Then they may be compelled to call me for their studio work."

Earlier this year, Ray left for Paris, France, to promote his sponsorship for Supernatural Cymbals, which manufactures handcrafted Turkish cymbals out of Istanbul. From there, he toured Holland in March with soul trumpet player Ernest Lane. He'll spend July touring with local Sublime

Paramedics came and bandaged me up, and I managed to play all night on my sliced-up leg. After the gig, I stopped at the ER in El Cajon and got eight stitches.'

### **BEST DAY OF THE WEEK?**

"I like Mondays, because I've engineered my life to make Monday my day off."

### IF YOU COULD TIME TRAVEL, WHEN/ WHERE WOULD YOU VACATION?



Bill Ray: "The main goal is to get people hooked on my feel.... Then they may be compelled to call me."

"I'd go back to the Renaissance and tell some futuristic secrets, and - just as they were burning me at the stake for heresy - I'd be, like, 'poof' and be gone. The legend would live on for centuries!'

### **FAVORITE CONCERT?**

"Dr. John, at Montreux Jazz Fest in 2002. We were on the road with Ike Turner and had the night off. We rolled up into Stravinsky Hall and ended up at the side of the stage, about ten feet from the man himself."

### **BIGGEST LIE YOU'VE EVER TOLD?**

"I had a pseudonym in my formative years in Mississippi. I suppose it had something to do with wanting to escape from the doldrums that was Jackson in the late 1980s."



Jeremy Messersmith has a voice so gentle that it makes Elliott Smith sound like Tom Waits. It's the kind of voice that's made for Iullables, and Lonce saw Messersmith use it to charm a room full of toddlers and their mothers. If you don't pay close attention, you might let this voice full you into thinking everything he sings is a simple love song. But even his love songs aren't simple: listen to "Beautiful Children," where the woman he secretly loves tells him about her new boyfriend. and he says. "I hope he loves you/ If he doesn't. at least you'll have beautiful children."

Since his debut in 2006, Minneapolis-based

Messersmith has always been good, but last year he took a giant leap forward with The Reluctant Graveyard, 11 songs about death. There are songs about organ donation, songs about brutally murdered women, songs about ghosts thinking they wasted their lives. His earlier work was made up mostly of guitar with some light electronic backup, but Graveyard has full arrangements - string quartets, full band, backup singers. Messersmith has said he was

trying to do something like Pet Sounds with a fraction of the Beach Boys' budget, and he almost succeeds

Despite its macabre subject matter, Graveyard sounds as uplifting and beautiful as "God Only Knows." Part of the reason for this is. again, Messersmith's voice. In "Violet," he sings, "Streaks of earth matted in her hair," but that gentle voice makes you think it's a love song.



# Some Enchanted Isle

*"The rarer action is in virtue than in vengeance."* 

ince *The Tempest* opened in 1611, people have wondered where Shakespeare located its strange, enchanted isle. Prospero's enemies are returning to Naples from a wedding at Tunis. A storm blasts them onto the rocks of

an unnamed bit of land — somewhere in between?

Some claim Bermuda, where a shipwreck in 1609 may have inspired Shakespeare to write the

play. Others propose Corfu or one of the Pontines between Tunis and Naples. Until September 25, the debate can take a breather. Prospero's island's at the Lowell Davies Festival Theatre. Director Adrian Noble has staged a musical mystery tour with magical results.

Noble may have taken his cue from Caliban. "The isle is full of noises," says the monster, "sounds and sweet airs that give delight and hurt not." Drums, cymbals, and gongs flank both sides of Ralph Funicello's spare, two-level set. Spirits, wearing pale blue surgical scrubs and brimless caps, sing and accompany songs with percussive rhythms. As in a radio broadcast, and aided by Alan Burrett's flashing snakes of lightning, they create a storm with booming sounds.

The cast doesn't just swing into unmotivated production numbers. Shaun Davey's enchanting,



original music grows from the story, as if it's been there all along. Act one, for example, concludes with a song of revolution; Act two, with a harmonic piece that includes the audience.

The sweet airs may "hurt not," but the island's also a treacherous place. Jonno

A favorite professor of mine once saw me

reading *The Tempest*, gritted his teeth, and said, "I can't point to a place in the text and say 'here it is,' but there's *something wrong* with Prospero!" In Miles Anderson's terrific interpretation, there is indeed. Cast adrift and left to die, Prospero dreams of revenge. He's developed a "rough magic" for 12 years. He doesn't know how strong it is or how long it'll last. But he's got the makings of a perfect storm for his betrayers.

When they arrive, he can resist his gentle nature and turn *The Tempest* into a revenge tragedy. Instead, and performed brilliantly by Anderson, Prospero makes a sea change: "the rarer action is in virtue than in vengeance." He comes home to himself. He forgives.

Noble has paired The Tempest with Amadeus.

And Anderson plays Prospero and Antonio Salieri, the court composer. At first the pairing's a puzzle. Then it makes sense. Both men play God. Prospero uses alchemy to rule the island like a colonial tyrant; Salieri, when his "God of Bargains" fails to deliver, assumes a Godlike wrath. He fights to "block" the genius Mozart. Though they have similar motivations, Prospero and Salieri become different sides of the same coin: Prospero renounces vindictiveness; Salieri embraces it.

Prospero doesn't slam the brakes completely. When he confronts his brother Antonio, Anderson has Prospero set to strike. It's a master move. Unlike so many Hallmark card versions of the play — the Bard's farewell to his art, la-dah — this Prospero's so human he can't turn 180 degrees on a dime. There *was* something wrong (my professor was right) and Prospero will need time to complete his transformation.

Actors usually play Ariel, the spirit-servant, as an enlarged version of Tinkerbell. Not Ben Diskant. His hair a cross between a fright-wig and Queen Nefertiti's flat-topped headdress, the tall, slender Diskant gives the spirit a graceful physicality, even on stilts. He also performs as an onstage conductor for much of the music, including an eerie rendition of "Full Fathom Five."


There are no weak links in a terrific ensemble, but the production does have another star: a huge, aqua-colored sheet, at various times, is a mainsail in a storm, large waves, a shore-break trickle, a wall, a fence. Like the music, the giant sheet's always in motion, always a dazzler.

A goal of advertising is "branding": make a product not only memorable but desirable. Years ago, Texaco had a slogan: "We're working to keep your trust." Like a mantra, the commercial ran so often, one soon forgot the trick embedded in the words: the ad assumed you already trusted Texaco.

Michele Riml's *Poster Boys* is about kinds of branding, in and out of advertising. Riml got the idea from an actual event: when an agency in Vancouver campaigned with gay and



It has been a fantastic trip. The Potter films blessed our hopes, shivered our nerves, widened our eyes, gladdened our hearts, made everything seem possible. ### **A Better Life**

Could A Better Life have been a better film? Sure, if art had been desired. Director Chris Weitz and his writers wanted a socially aware movie with theme-driven appeal, upheld by good casting and honest effort. That they got, supported by cinematographer Javier Aguirresarobe (The Road) and star Demián Bichir. For Bichir, who has played Fidel Castro and Emiliano Zapata, this is a pride platform much as La Mission was for Benjamin Bratt in 2009, Selena was for Jennifer Lopez in 1997, and Born in East L.A. was for Cheech Marin in 1987.

Carlos (Bichir) is a Mexican illegal in L.A., up from the day-labor hiring pool to assist a Latino gardener who owns a truck. A chance to buy that truck arises. Carlos senses that his teen son Luis (José Julián) is in danger of falling into gang life, still missing his absent mother and embarrassed that dad is a hard-scrabble worker. The truck is a ticket to more than selfemployment. It becomes almost as freighted with value as the bike of the desperate father and son in The Bicycle Thieves.

Bichir's work has a deep, urgent validity, without any mural poses, and Julián goes somewhat beyond the generic marks of his film type. The barrio rooting is vividly honest, the father and son choices feel truly lived, and a late confrontation pays off credibly. These are hard times, not just for émigré gardeners, and director Weitz has extended the decent sympathies of his 2002 success, About a Boy. \*\*\*

### The Names of Love

The Names of Love, director Mi-14, chel Leclerc and writing partner Baya 전 Kasmi, who is of Algerian lineage, dive right into France's bubbling cauldron of ethnic, religious, and nationalsh identity anxieties. The first truly adult film I ever saw is Gillo Pontecorvo's masterpiece The Battle of Algiers, about Algeria's bloody war of liberation against French colonial occupation. Former secretary of defense Donald Rumsfeld supposedly ordered mandatory viewings to get soldiers familiar with urban warfare. A well-deserved reputation as one of the best films ever made.

This British sci-fi film Devil Girl from Mars inspired late sci-fi writing superstar Octavia Butler to begin writing at 12 because she found it so bad and decided she could do better. A leatherclad femme fatale from Mars arrives on Earth to conscript Earthmen to use as breeding stock in a scheme to repopulate the red planet. Do the women of Earth put up a fight or use this opportunity to get rid of their male oppressors?

Although I'm not particularly a history buff, this nearly two-hour film about a cadre of civil rights activists - or "outside agitators" — and their resolve to challenge segregation in the deep South with direct, non-violent action had me riveted the whole time.

In honor of LGBTO Pride, I've got to make mention of the short-lived series Noah's Arc that offered an alternative to Fast Coast predecessor Queer as Folk. My friends were energized after the debut screening of the pilot in New York but years later I laugh, wonder, or scoff in disbelief every time I see an episode. In addition to extras, like the pilot, the first season featured a great music soundtrack.

if the rattled French are not simply grateful that someone approached this hot mess of issues with humor and a certain esprit de frivolité.

Forestier is Baya, very Parisian and Euro, yet proudly and demonstrably of Algerian background. She is certainly not Muslim in her fierce, solo campaign to seduce and convert "fasho" (fascist) men by splashing them with the erotic elixir of herself. This provides the camera, and our zooming eyes, many frissons of nakedness. Even Charles de Gaulle might have grandly

murmured "oo-la-la." Forestier's body, a lovely, liberated, Franco-Arabic-UNESCO body, was surely the film's export visa.

Among those thrilled by it is Arthur (Jacques Gamblin), a starchy, rather humorless scientist who doesn't want to talk about his family's lost Jewish identity, though it triggers a funny dinner conversation that touches the third-rail issue of Holocaust PC. And so it goes, including a cameo by famous (in France) Socialist politician Lionel Jospin, a dead-swan scene that

might have milked even the tear ducts of Tchaikovsky, a ridiculous episode in which Baya goes briefly behind the veil, and such lines as "our families are like two slices of history making love." Gamblin is an actor of sly, witty dryness, but the movie sinks or swims (breast stroke, of course) on what you think of Forestier.

Not since Didi Conn in You Light Up My Life has a performer been so eager to light up our lives. No, not even Audrey Tautou in Amélie, Sally Hawkins in Happy-Go-Lucky, or Sandra Bullock in The Blind Side. Leclerc claims to be a disciple of Woody Allen, and we can see a slight, French-fried resemblance to the little jester. But in his patchy, pumped, hurl-it-together way, Leclerc is closer to the L.A. indie (and vanity) director Henry Jaglom, and Forestier is like a sexier, sharper version of Jaglom's favorite star, the insistently irritating Tanna Frederick. You have been warned.

### Winnie the Pooh

Charm, thy name is Winnie the Pooh. And if you say that has been true since A.A. Milne concocted the Pooh tales over 80 years ago, let us add that the Disney team has stayed true to their Winnie the Pooh and the Honey Tree of 1966. They have kept the old-line spirit of E.H. Shepard's delightful illustrations, with just an extra dash of digital zip, and have pulled off the expected whimsies with seamless verve.

It's still a yummy good time in the Hundred Acre Wood, Eevore is still the most delightful of depressives, and kids packed into a local preview laughed along happily. John Cleese provides narration like a dear uncle. Jim Cummings voices Pooh with fond, rusty traces of Disney's late vocal stalwart Sterling Holloway.

Preceeding the film is a new (also 2-D) short from Disney, The Ballad of Nessie, which may be the most antigolf cartoon ever made. \*\*\*

Despite the lack of chemistry between Roberts and Hanks, the film is redeeming — through Larry, who is open to all things lively and good. Brad Pitt is an opaque, tough-love dad pious about his rules, Jessica Chastain is a shimmering vessel of the inexpressively maternal, and Sean Penn is barely used. The fine kid-actor Hunter McCracken simmers in sullen agony as the traumatized son.
