



Moores, forced to unload the team during a bitter divorce battle, is expanding his lucrative sports-consulting business to universities and colleges. The latest recruits to his firm are interim Big 12 commissioner Chuck

Neinas and University of Texas athletic director **DeLoss**

Dodds, both advisors to the college division of JMI Sports LLC. Ex-San Diego State athletic director Jeff Schemmel has been named managing director of the operation. "I'm thrilled to be part of a company that provides a much-needed array of services on this ever-changing intercollegiate athletics landscape," says a statement attributed to Schemmel in a September 26 news release. "I'm equally thrilled to be working alongside people I respect as much as I do Erik Judson and John Moores, and the advisors on our JMI Sports team."

Schemmel resigned his San Diego State post in November 2009 after it was revealed that he employed taxpayer funds to pay for a trip to see his alleged mistress in Alabama. Upon Schemmel's exit, then-SDSU president Stephen Weber agreed to forgive a \$20,000 home loan, have the state pay Schemmel a \$116,000 settlement fee, and write a letter of recommendation for him. Judson, principal of JMI Sports, is a former Padres executive who worked on construction of the team's Petco Park and still sits on the club's board.

The San Diego County Workforce Index rose slightly in August after falling for two straight months, and Cafferty

unemployment is a "national crisis." And is hopeful. But he realizes that sufficient help won't come from Washington: "Locally, we have to incentivize companies to bring more workers on board."

> Marney Cox, chief economist of San Diego Association of Governments, has questions about some government stimulus schemes, but he is in favor of the infrastructure pro-

grams. Some economists contend that

such programs don't put people to work quickly because there's a long lag before they go into effect. But in San Diego, "We have

> projects that have been through the

vetting process, such as roadways that will improve border crossing, lower wait times, and be worth \$7 billion to the economy." Similarly, there are

San Diego. airport- and waterexpansion plans and sewer upgrades that are ready to go.

> But, says Cox, politics sometimes gets in the way of efficient ameliorative programs. After the housing bubble burst, "There were five states in which the construction industry and employees took the brunt of the problems." One state was California. But the federal programs to help housing were aimed at all 50 states — thus lessening impact where it was needed. "We should be doing away with the generalized policies

that are open to everyone. And mortgage subsidies are a bad idea. When you bail out people of bad decisions, it sets in motion more of these types of decisions."

Politicians are touting programs that subsidize socalled green, clean tech indus-

tries. But Gary London of the London Group says that only growth in construction can pull San Diego out

of the slough. Will construction ride to the rescue? "In 2009 and 2010, we had the lowest number of housing units under construction since World War

II," says Kelly Cunningham, economist for the National University System Institute for Policy Research, noting the county has lost 40 to 45 percent of its construction jobs. "[This year] housing construction will be up some but will also be one of the lowest in years. Our

houses are among the most unaffordable in the nation, and we need more housing. But we are not building, partly because of the overhang of foreclosures; we have to work

through that."

But Cunningham is critical of federal programs to jack up housing. The federal homebuyer tax credits

Hidden Pipeline, Secret Menace?

ome residents refer to it as the Sleeping Giant. An eight-inch-diameter Navy pipeline, carrying diesel and jet fuel from

Point Loma to Miramar, lies beneath San Diego streets and canyons. Each year, 323 million gallons of fuel are pumped through the pipe at 800 pounds of pressure per square inch. The pipeline is 57 years old.

Jim Gilhooly, a 26-year resident of Point Loma, has 40 years of experience in the pipeline industry, including work on the Alaska pipeline. As Gilhooly tells it, the Navy's pipe should have been replaced 20 years ago.

"Corrosion in buried pipelines, whether they be oil, gas, or water, is a fact of life," he says. "Average life of pipelines without lifeextension programs is 20 to 30 years."

Gilhooly's Point Loma home perches above San

Diego Bay, overlooking Defense Fuel Support Point, Point Loma, the largest naval fuel farm in the world. Gilhooly says the pipeline's 1/4-inch walls have worn thin from corrosion, and because

the fuel is pumped in intervals, the line is susceptible to corrosion from condensation. He warns of the consequences if the pipe were to rupture. He cites the Exxon-Mobil pipeline that ruptured last July in Montana.

"Some people think that a leak would be like a dribble coming from a faucet, but when you're working with 800 [pounds per square inch of pressure], when that gets a leak, that will shoot half of a mile, like a shot out of a gun," he says. "Depending on when they catch that break, if they are using pumps that are 2000 gallons per minute, then the spill would be substantial. Not only does the fuel have a high flash point, but you also have the fuel vapor and the environmental impacts.

"But they don't want to answer that. They are leaving the community out of it, and that's a cardinal sin."

From the fuel farm, the 17-mile pipeline extends along Rosecrans Street, turns north to cross the San Diego River near Interstate 8, crosses the Rose Canyon Fault near Tecolote Road, and runs under the Tecolote

Unhappy Returns

The Chaldean "victims" in your article should win an academy award for playing the victims. A lot of the other merchants in this area read this article, and their reaction is the same — not surprised. They always try to beat the system.

I am a department manager for a major department-store chain in the community and have to deal with numerous Chaldean customers, young and old, on a daily basis. We are constantly bombarded with merchandise being returned without receipts that has been worn and/or torn that has "only been worn to try on." Since they are familiar with our store's policy, they demand a full cash refund or new merchandise; otherwise, they will lodge a complaint. Of course, we have to cave in.

They usually like to scam the system by insisting on using expired coupons or trying to make a deal — "If I buy this shirt, can I get the other free?"

If it's the younger generation that is getting into trouble, it's certainly no surprise. Chaldean parenting skills in a store or restaurant are nonexistent. Their kids run rampant through the aisles throwing shirts, shoes, jackets off the racks while their parents are talking on their cell phones, oblivious to what is happening. Their kids play with shopping carts, ramming them into the heels of other shoppers. No discipline is administered, and it takes a long time to straighten up the aisles after they leave.

with the timing when our friends Jordan and Katie invited us over for *shabu-shabu* night — Katie got Jordan one of the specialty pots for his birthday. *Shabu-shabu* is the fondue of Japan, but rather than spear and dip, morsels are grasped in chopsticks and "swish-swished."

I'd never had *shabu-shabu* before, but after the other night, I'm a fan. We began with simple broth — water and *dashi* stock with

some chunks of ginger and garlic, placed over a fire in the middle of the table and set to boil. Jordan explained that the food we cooked in the boiling liquid would add to its flavor — first, thinly sliced bits of pork and beef, then vegetables (spinach, bok choy, several varieties of mushrooms), all of which you dip into a sesame-flavored dipping sauce. The last thing to go in are udon noodles, which you add to your bowl with a few ladle scoops of what has, by this time, become a very flavorful broth.

My favorite thing about the process is that it stretches the meal and enhances the dining experience. Taking tiny sips of chilled sake, intermittently biting morsels as they cook, allows more time to talk with friends and appreciate the food. Also, unlike my previous fondue experiences (with oil, cheese, chocolate, thick chunks of meat, bread, and fruit), this one didn't leave me feeling overstuffed, even though Katie pointed out we were the only friends to help "finish eating all the vegetables."

I double-checked one of the apps on my phone and then said, "Kore wa oishii desu! That means 'This is delicious."

"So, you think this time you'll try *shabu-shabu* in Japan?" David asked. He tried to get me to enter one of the *shabu-shabu* joints on our last trip, but I insisted on sticking to food I was comfortable with, like ramen and rice.

"Hai, shabu-shabu ga suki desu," I said, and this time it was David's turn to smile proudly.

Jane could see the confusion on my face. "Aren't you happy for me?"


"Yes, of course, I'm just... I didn't know you were actively looking. And that you found one."





STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

Hey, Matt

There must be an end to the earth's supply of oil. Has anyone predicted when that will happen?

— Just Wondering, via email

By now you must recognize the back-ground music to this week's puzzler. Hear it? The sharp tones of science guys arguing. They do agree that dead dinos and such created our oil reserves hundreds of millions of years ago. It apparently took 10 million years to create that oil. They do agree we're not likely to have another dino

invasion; ergo, gas and oil are not renewable. What we got is what we got, and eventually we'll have none. They mostly agree the world uses 84 million gallons of crude oil a day; the U.S. uses 25 percent of that. But that about ends it.

Despite advances in oil-finding technology, we basically have no real idea of how much oil and gas is hidden in Earth's mantle. We don't even have a precise measure of the size of the reserves that are presently being pumped. Back in the 1950s, a Shell Oil technician developed what's now known as the Hubbert Curve, based on the pumping history of depleted oil wells. He claimed it can predict the point at which a well stops giving up the easy-to-get-at crude ("peak oil") and production declines, then stops. Applying Hubbert's Curve to present-day wells, believers in the truth of the Curve estimate that we might be out of oil and gas between 2050 and 2100, assuming usage continues its 1–2 percent annual increase. U.S. estimators say our peak oil came in the 1970s; the big ole North Sea peak oil came in 1999.

Big-oil bully BP once estimated that the earth holds a total of 1.23 trillion barrels of oil, with our gas gauges hitting empty in 2040. The U.S. Geologic Survey in 2000 offered the more optimistic 3 trillion barrels worldwide. But no matter which estimates you believe, they all fall within the next 100 years. But again, we can't actually see the reserves, so we don't really know.

An extension of your question should be, how much are we willing to pay for oil? Considering how crucial oil is to the world's economy, it's relatively cheap. But once the "easy" oil has been pumped, the rest requires more effort and more \$\$\$. Have we found all the "easy" wells? Science guys agree that the future of oil will rely more and more on difficult and expensive locating, pumping, and processing methods — deep-sea, oil sands, the ecologically nightmarish oil shale...

Matt:

Two questions about local newscasters: (1) When they speak about current weather conditions,

WHY have they started comparing them to "where we SHOULD be"? How can "should" enter into a discussion about weather conditions? Who decided what our weather "should" be? Perhaps they mean to compare current conditions to what has been AVERAGE OR STAN-DARD over a period of years? If so, why don't they say so? (2) Why do they start nearly every dialog with the word "And"? SO DARN ANNOYING! I listen to Channel 10 news in the morning when getting ready for work (but I hear it on ALL the stations), and not only do the news-

casters and weather forecasters do it, but they've got their CHP road conditions guy doing it too? I find it tremendously boring, repetitive, uncreative, unnecessary, a grammatical mess, and WEIRD!!! AND — PLEASE RESPOND — I don't know who else to write to — the TV stations don't respond. — DM. via email

They didn't respond? You're surprised? We once tackled a similar newscaster question having to do with the expression "when something went terribly wrong." You know, like, "Sam was washing his cat when something went terribly wrong." "Ben was evening up his sideburns when something went terribly wrong." I guess I answered the question because I'd noticed the same annoying thing. Less than a week later, I was idly watching the news when I heard a 'caster launch into a story with, "Mr. Sutton was simply driving to day-care to pick up his child, when some — uh, when this incident occurred." I was thrilled! I took full credit for stopping one more script-reader from saying that dry, old phrase. Did someone post my column on the bulletin board in the newspeople's breakroom? Anyway, I still take full credit for that.

As for your annoyances, remember weathergangs and highway patrollers have only a minute or two to make their point. Can't go into long explanations each time they put up a number. Somehow the shorthand for "based on the averages calculated from historical temperature/ rain/whatever data, this is where we should be" has become "where we should be." Live with it. Weatherbeings' vocabularies are actually fairly limited to quasi-techie talk, the same stuff over and over. The nature of the job. Speech habits flourish in this environment. As for "and"? Years ago it was verboten to begin a sentence with "and" or "but." But (got that?) these days even stuffy old newspapers have dropped the convention and begin sentences willy-nilly.

pleased as KPBS. The play's mixing of comedy and suicide has led some members of the community to call for it to be boycotted and even shut down. Critics are particularly troubled by the play's opening moments, which feature a teenage girl vomiting prodigiously after deciding to kill her-

Not everyone was disarmed. "While we understand 🕏 that Nunes often writes in a provocative manner, this play



is highly insensitive and potentially dangerous," said Jennifer Von Durst, regional director for the American Legion of Suicide Stoppage. "We know from more than five decades of research that certain types of media portrayals of suicide can inadvertently be harmful to vulnerable individuals, especially youth, leading to what behavioral scientists call suicide contagion, or copycat suicide. Making a suicidal girl the 'star' of the show glamorizes this horrific act. Suicide continues to be stigmatized, and media portrayals that make light of suicide contribute to that stigma and misinformation. We urge N'Oreo to stop production of this play immediately."

"I get that the play is supposed to be heartwarmingly gritty and darkly funny at the same time, but it's just not humorous," said Greg Eastbrook. "There are topics that, no matter how talented you are as

a playwright, will never be funny. Suicide, September 11th, the Holocaust, cancer, war, murder, child abuse, to name a few. I can come up with more if needed, in order to hit one that Nunes has been affected by and to which she would be sensitive."

"Are you freaking


serious?" asked Natasha, who declined to give her last name. "This play should NEVER have been written, let alone performed. This type of 'art' does a disservice to those of us who have had to endure the pain and wreckage that is left behind. A person's decision to end their life is not an easy one. Before putting something like this onstage, people should really think a little on how it might affect some in the community."

But others were moved to defend the play. "Good theater is an experience that makes us feel," wrote Irene Hubble in the Old Town Gazette. "Emotions can run the gamut from joy to sorrow, from hope to hopeless, from fear to anger. The important thing is to experience these human feelings as we walk out of the darkened theater into the light of our own individual emotions. N'Oreo's plays have always done that for me."

San Diego Airport to Replace "Smarte Carts" with "Prison Porters"

Plan Would Ease Stress on Overcrowded County Prisons, Also Ease Stress on Overburdened Airline Passengers

"We think people will appreciate 'that human touch."

NERVOUSLY CLUTCH-ING CARRY-ON, SAN DIEGO AIRPORT — Ever since California's move last spring to transfer thousands of convicts from state supervision to county oversight, local prison officials have been scrambling to find new ways to house and engage the the suddenly swollen ranks of their prison populations.

The newest plan, issued by the County Board of Supervisors, calls for finding ways to let non-violent, non-sexual offenders serve time outside of jail, in the community. "Overcrowding is a problem, obviously," said Scott Stipplebaum, head of County Correctional Catering Services. "Suddenly, we've got




800 beds for 2000 prisoners. You don't want to think about that for too long.'

But, says Stipplebaum, "an even bigger concern is funding. How am I supposed to feed 2000 prisoners on a food budget designed for 800? I'm not Jesus; I can't multiply the loaves and fishes. Not that I can afford fish in the first place."

That budgetary strain is

presumably what led the board of supervisors to contract with the San Diego Port District to replace the San Diego Airport's Smarte Cart luggage carriers with the aforementioned "non-violent, non-sexual offenders." "For just \$2," said Stipplebaum, "travelers can hire a 'Prison Porter' to carry their

bags from curb to counter or baggage claim to parking lot, no tip required. There are even plans under way to set up a special security line for porters handling carry-ons, so that passengers can enjoy hands-free movement throughout their airport experience. It's wonderful to see government do something right for a change."







Hawk Hill. Part 2



The Golden Gate Raptor Observatory counts about 20 to 50 migrating broad-winged hawks each year.

o, I'm standing atop Hawk Hill, a 940-foot rise located on the north end of the Golden Gate Bridge and lookout point for the largest known raptor migration path on the West Coast. This is high season.

Here is a unique spot of ground. Northern Marin County and Tomales Bay act as a funnel guiding raptors to Hawk Hill, which may explain why there are 300 Golden Gate Raptor Observatory volunteers on call. Every year raptor observatory volunteers stand watch from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., daily, save for rainy days, from mid-August to mid-December. They count raptors.

This is a good day. Finally, after a couple weeks of overcast, fog, and even rain, today is clear and warm. Added bonus, it's a weekday, so civilians are absent.

The peak overlooks San Francisco city and bay, but no one pays attention to that. I count 19 men and a half-dozen women who are either volunteers or committed birders. I may be the only outlander here.

A man calls out, "One broad-wing leaving the cloud into the blue." Another man announces, "Osprey coming in over FM (FM tower). We got a high osprey coming in."

Another man calls out, "There's a red-tail [hawk] passing over Hill 88."

A woman says, "Adult tail, got it."

Second woman, "That bird's been

Man, "There's a red-tail just off the saddleback "

"Okay, how high up?"

"Up.

The callouts are well shy of continuous. Between callouts, birders tell stories and jokes, but stories are interrupted by callouts, and jokes are short comments or one-liners.

Birds take precedent over everything. Over the course of an hour I see raptors by the ones and twos, but not a mass of raptors, not a battle line of raptors.

I ask a gray-haired woman if this is a good raptor day. She says, "Yes, a lot of red-tails. In the last hour we had nine. We've had bad weather, not many team days so far, so this is a good day."

"What's the most unusual bird you've

"Broad-wings are really good-looking birds. This is the only place you'll see broadwings in the West."

"Yeah. Broad-wings are a very Eastern bird, you can see them anywhere on the East Coast."

"How come they're here?"

"Some live in British Columbia and higher north. A lot of broad-wings migrate down the Mississippi River, but a few go down the West Coast."

A man calls out, "Cooper's [hawk], over the saddleback."

My companion continues with broadwinged hawks. "They are a mass-migrating bird back East, so places like Cape May [New Jersey] get thousands of broad-wings in the air. We get a handful, between 20 and 50 every year on the hill."

"Have you ever seen a tornado of raptors?"

"We do get some giant hawk kettles [birds circling tightly in a thermal updraft] but not the thousands you get back East. We've had a couple kettles forming over Soccer Hill this morning...20 to 30 birds."

There is always one person who stands out. This time it is the youngest volunteer: late 20s, a woman, tall, brown hair, big round brown eyes, wearing a Golden Gate Raptor Observatory baseball cap, blue vest, and jeans. She's scoring the birds as volunteers call them out.

I can't remember the last time I've been with a person who has as open a face as this woman's. It's as if every emotion she feels is instantly transmitted onto her countenance. I have a clear, unobstructed view into her soul. The sight takes my breath, her light is so bright I have to turn away.

Of course, I turn back. We chat, I learn about her college, learn she is an intern on the counting team, lives on the Marin Headlands with other interns, and as she talks she shows me how much fun it is to be young and living in a national park; how she loves raptors; how she likes working with these people, loves working in teams.

It wasn't a sexual thing, wasn't a love thing, and it definitely wasn't about birds. It was standing before a person who, it seemed to me, is transparent.

Mesmerizing.

Game of the Week: #6 Mount Miguel at #1 Helix

La Mesa — In the battle for the Claymore Sword, top-ranked Helix delivered a one-sided result over a ranked rival. The Highlanders scored on their first five drives and rolled to a convincing 49-7 victory over sixth-ranked and previously unbeaten Mount Miguel on Friday night.

"I thought we had better personnel coming in — almost player to player — and when you have that, all you have to do is take care of business," said Helix head coach Troy Starr.

After forcing a Mount Miguel punt on the game's opening drive, Helix (4-1) needed only three plays to drive 66 yards and find the end zone. The Highlanders took a 7-0 lead on a Brandon Lewis 6-yard touchdown pass to receiver Kendal Keys, the first of three Helix touchdowns in the first quarter.

"We watched film on them all week, so we kind of knew what was coming," Lewis said.

Midway through the second quarter, Helix extended its lead over Mount Miguel (4-1) with a pair of touchdowns in quick succession. With 6:44 left in the half, Lewis threw a 35-yard touchdown pass to Gary Thompson to cap a 92-yard scoring drive, and 36 seconds later Lewis found Keys for a 28-yard score on the first play following an interception.

"The game plan was to come out and run, run, run, then go over the top," Lewis said. "We executed it to perfection tonight."

Coronado Cruises Past Crawford to Extend League Streak

El Cerrito — In the massive Central League, Coronado is cruising early. Against Crawford on Friday afternoon, the Islanders scored touchdowns on their first four drives and rolled to a 48-6 win to ruin the Colts' homecoming.

"Hopefully we can carry all these wins and keep going," said Coronado receiver Paul

Rodriguez caught touchdown passes of 3, 7,



"I tend to like most kids, just not all of them. I like more kids than adults, though."

"I vowed long ago never to move east of route 805!" my friend C.C. admonished me when I told him I was looking for an apartment in an affordable area. My first choice was North Park, where I had lived for some time; but with the advent of the endless Great Recession (read "Depression," though no politician will go near that one), North Park has become less than

affordable to those making under \$50,000 a year. Somewhat more affordable is what certain oleaginous realtors are calling East North Park, which is, in fact, City Heights. C.H. is a historically high-crime area in San Diego. I once joined a police officer on a ride-along some years ago, when they still did that, and my experience seemed to bear that out with the exception of 7-Eleven parking lots,

where squad cars would congregate over coffee and donuts. In such places I found very little evidence of crime.

Still, not one to be swayed by opinion or possibly prejudice, I looked into the area between, say, 32nd Street and the City Heights Transit Center. Rents seemed indeed cheaper, and the old Huffman apartments seemed a tad more funky than they might have a few blocks west. The area, and I'm not sure exactly why, seemed to remind me of the neighborhood I lived in in Brooklyn for two years, when my then-wife and I were struggling new parents. Likely it had to do with the ubiquity of families; that is to say, kids. I imagined it could get a bit noisy at inconvenient times. And it had an impressive number of collarless cats. A few pit bulls promised a kind of cacophonous symphony between 2 and 4 a.m. This, by the way, proved correct, but then I experienced the same thing during a yearlong residential stint in La Jolla years ago.

Adults who are quick to say, "I just love children!" are, I think, being disingenuous. I used to be guilty of that similar misspeaking until I was forced (after an encounter with a sadistic brat named Brian, who terrorized my son and his friends) to amend my generosity to, "I tend to like most kids, just not all of them. I like more kids than adults, though."


At any rate, I did cruise 36th, 37th, and 38th streets between University and El Cajon with an eye toward little SpongeBob T-shirts or Barbie sun suits or clothing bulges hiding small-caliber handguns. I turned up nothing, leading me to the conclusion that it was the parents who might be armed.

Another observation was the frequency and demeanor of the cops cruising by in their "shops," or squad cars. In the three days of my perusing the neighborhood, I saw the police stop no one at all, and no reason why they should have. I saw no crimes in progress, suspicious activity (whatever that may be), and no cause to drive by at anything other than a sensible speed, as if their eyes were open, their minds relaxed but attentive. One might say, maybe a little fancifully, that the officers seemed to generate something of a philosophical aura. Poised, one might say, but hardly

provocative — again, in my opinion.

Clicking on "Inside San Diego/City Heights," I found an interesting bit on that page. Chamber of commerce promotional, maybe, but fairly accurate. There is also quite a bit about the diversity of restaurants in the area, and while the majority seem Mexican, by no means is that the only fare one will find.

The web page reads, in part, "The area



"Probably more than any other area of San Diego County, City Heights is a true melting pot of different ethnic groups. From Hispanic to African-American to Ethiopian to Vietnamese to Cambodian, City Heights is a community of immigrants trying to carve out a life in this city. Housing in this neighborhood is more affordable relative to the rest of the city, although it is dense with a mixture of small cottages and aging apartments."

The fact is, I've put down a deposit on a place in — and I'm getting used to saying this — East North Park. If my son approves, and no reason I can see why not, it is his as well. Been a long time coming.

My sister-in-law and I are scheduled for a birthday lunch, and she wants to go out. It's kind of a rare event these days, because she discovered a year ago that she's gluten intolerant. "Going to restaurants is just a gauntlet of self-denial," she lamented. "It starts with the bread and runs through the chocolate lava cake." I resolved to find her some interesting possibilities.

My first call was to Terry Meihaus, owner of La Farfalla Café in Escondido (760-741-0835; lafarfallacafe.com). "My original plan was just to offer gluten-free brownies," began Meihaus. "But I got such a response that I decided to offer gluten-free items all the time. Now almost anything on our menu can be ordered gluten-free. All our salad dressings are naturally gluten-free — things such as

naturally gluten-free — things such as fig vinegar with caramelized shallots. Also desserts, such as our chocolate chip cookies or chocolate-zucchini cupcakes topped with buttercream frosting [\$1.50]. Entrées can be made gluten-free for a \$1 charge, things such as our shallot and warm chicken salad with goat cheese, Asian pears, blueberries, and candied walnuts [\$9.95]. And we have a quinoa tabouleh, which is both vegan and gluten-free [\$8.95]. Those are really

Meihaus also offers glutenfree cooking classes (\$30 for roughly three and a half hours).

"So many prepared foods have gluten in them — things you wouldn't expect, such as ice cream and salad dressing. I've been cooking gluten-free for about 25 years, and while it isn't easy, my goal is to make a gluten-free diet livable. I offer a Beginners' Basics class where I go over ideas for breakfast, lunch, snacks, and dinner.

"A lot of the store-bought mixes aren't that good, or they're really expensive. I give recipes for cornbread, poppyseed muffins, and pancakes using things such as rice flour, almond flour, and sorghum flour, plus tapioca starch and potato starch. I'll have people cook in teams, and along the way, I'll give them tips — how to correct texture problems or how the age of your flour affects your outcome. For instance, older flour tends to absorb liquid.

"Later this year I'll offer a holiday class on how to make a gluten-free traditional Thanksgiving dinner. where people can make a tray full of different kinds of holiday cookies."

Filiberto, manager at Casa Guadalajara in Old Town (619-295-5111; casaguadalajara.com), has an extensive gluten-

free menu. Once again, demand was the catalyst. "We researched our products and found that things like our bases — beef, chicken, and vegetable — were not gluten-free. They had wheat product in them. We went out and found bases without wheat product. Also, when we make our corn tortillas and corn chips every day,

we do it first thing in the morning, before any other flour products go into the fryer. That way we avoid cross-contamination, and our corn tortillas stay gluten-free."

Gluten-free items at Casa Guadalajara include "chicken, beef, or shrimp fajitas [\$14.95]. We have shrimp salad [\$11.95] or ceviche [\$11.95] as a starter, and also chicken tortilla soup [\$5.75] and fish tacos [\$11.95]."

Fabrizio, chef at Bencotto in Little Italy (619-450-4786; lovebencotto.com),

told me that he offered a glutenfree pasta option (\$13). "You

choose the sauce — maybe bencotto, which is a pink pancetta sauce, or a traditional meat sauce like Bolognese — and we serve it over gluten-free pasta. We use a good-quality pasta; it's made from quinoa. It gives you a better consistency

than pasta made from cornmeal or rice flour. It's a bit different from regular pasta — it's a little softer in consistency." They offer numerous other gluten-free options.

In North Park, Morgan at Urban Solace (619-295-6464; *urbansolace.net*) has a glutenfree menu. "A good starter is the diced watermelon, cucumber, and tomato salad garnished with pine nuts, feta cheese, and a pomegranate vinaigrette [\$9.50]. Or maybe the goat cheese and butternut squash dip — it's usually served with chips, but you can order it with cucumber slices instead."



In a recent Vanity Fair article, Groupon founder Andrew Mason is described as "the type of guy who comes up with wild ideas that often have no beginning or end, and then lets them rip." Recent billionaire stories like Mason's have built a specific image associated with the word "entrepreneur." Often, it calls to mind educated, smartalecky white guys with highly developed tech skills.

Somalia-born business owner Said Dubed may represent a different demographic of entrepreneurs than 30-yearold Mason, but it wouldn't be a stretch to describe him, too, as "a guy who comes up with wild ideas... and then lets them rip."

Dubed's Far Janna market sits near the northeastern corner of University and 54th Street. The shelves are sparsely stocked with Jif peanut butter, Comet cleaning products, and a range of jars, cans, and bottles bearing Arabic writing. Beneath the foreign (to me) script, one glass jar reads "Labneh in oil." Inside, white balls float in a clear, yellow liquid.

The approximately 1000-square-foot space looks sparse now, but Dubed assures me, I would

have been shocked to see it six months ago.

"I started from empty," he says. "For the first four months, I only sold drinks. Like Arizona [Iced Tea], Coke, stuff like that."

A year ago, Dubed bought this market over the phone. From Atlanta, Georgia. The move was

bold not only because of the distance, but also because he'd never seen the store, didn't know the man he'd bought it from, and knew little about San Diego except that it had a large Somali community.

In Atlanta, where he'd lived since his familv arrived in the U.S., Dubed had worked as a taxi driver and a produce seller (at a farmers' market). He'd received a certificate in electronics assembly and taken some classes at Atlanta Metropolitan College, but when the distance from work to school proved too great and the schedules too competitive, he chose work over school. In addition to his weekday jobs, Dubed bought clothes at clearance prices and sold them on the street for a small profit on weekends.

During those Atlanta years, Dubed visited relatives in San Diego three times. In early 2010, when he decided he "was tired of living in Atlanta," he began to think seriously about moving to San Diego.

"I thought it would be a better life here," he says, his voice soft and gravelly. "I wanted to do business. It's hard [in Atlanta]. Here, it's still hard, but over there,

they don't have a lot of Somali people."

Dubed says he would have been happy owning one of three businesses: a Mediterranean restaurant, an electronics shop of the AT&T or T-Mobile sort, or a grocery store. In February 2010, a friend called from San Diego and told him about a building at the edge of City Heights, in the thick of the Somali community. It had once been a taco shop and still bore a sign that read "POLLO

AL CARBON Mexican Food." After the taco shop closed, someone else had rented the space and tried their luck at turning it into a grocery store, but that had failed, and now the business was for sale.

"I talked to the business owner by phone, and then I bought it from him." Dubed shrugs slightly, as if unsure why these details matter.

We're seated at the red, green, and yellow picnic table in front of the market. It's not yet 5:00 p.m., and so far, the before-dinner rush hasn't begun. Dubed's friend and coworker Mohammed (short and light to Dubed's tall, thin, and dark) has joined us, in case we need help communicating.

Two weeks after his initial phone call with the business owner, Dubed landed in San Diego, gave the guy \$10,000, and promised him another \$15,000 later. The deal was that, for as long as he still owed the \$15,000, he'd pay \$1500 each month. This bought him the key. And with the key came everything left behind by the previously failed market business.

While he's explaining all this, a man approaches from the sidewalk. He shouts something to Dubed, who flashes him a smile, jumps up, and leads the man inside. Mohammed picks up where Dubed left off.

"So he gets the key, which means everything is ready," Mohammed says, smiling. "He owns everything inside, the fridges, and everything me how he started out as one of Dubed's customers, how they began

that's been done. He didn't have to do any of the work."



"I do everything he can't do." Mohammed brings me inside, where, after the bright sunlight, our eyes must adjust to the dimness. "I go shopping to get stuff in here. Right now, I'm trying to see what's missing, so tomorrow morning I can go shopping." He gestures toward a wooden fruit stand against the wall to the right of the register. "See, like, we're out of tomatoes and bananas."

Two more customers come and go, both men. One shows me his two gallon-jugs of milk and explains that

he comes to the store "not only because it's Somali," but because it's close enough to his home that he can walk. "I don't need to drive, and they have everything. Except clothes. At Kmart [across the street] I buy the clothes. Here they have food, drink, milk, meat, chicken."

Dubed comes back and reminds me that this wasn't always the case. He didn't have the money to offer more than drinks until May, when he began to accept Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) cards and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) checks from those on

public assistance.

"When I got EBT, people started coming," he says. "Most of my customers use EBT. After two more months, I got WIC, and I got more customers. Then I started selling Mexican food. Pollo."

The Mexican food didn't last long. After four months, the guys he'd hired to make the pollo "got locked up," and he lost the customers he'd originally gained from their food.

In December, Dubed went to the International Rescue Committee looking for a loan to stock his shelves with the things he'd need to draw in more customers. But the organization needed to see him settle some other matters first.

Turns out, \$1000 of the \$1500 Dubed paid to the business owner each month went to the landlord for rent. But the other \$500 had not gone toward the \$15,000 he owed the business owner.

"The bottom line of the situation," Joel Chrisco of the organization's microenterprise program later tells me, "is that when [Dubed] started the business, he was in there informally without a lease agreement. He was unfamiliar with how business lease agreements



worked or the importance of having a signed lease. He followed his dream of opening a market without really knowing all the legal and regulatory requirements that come along with being a business owner."

After Chrisco and Dubed met with the business owner and the landlord and wrote up agreements with both, Dubed received a \$10,000 loan from the program. He spent about \$6000 on goods from a company in Minnesota that carries products, such as dates and date-filled cookies from Saudia Arabia that Somali people buy. As per his agreements,

every month Dubed now pays \$1000 directly to the landlord and \$500 toward the remaining \$10,000 that he owes the business owner. He also pays \$271.77 monthly toward his loan from the International Rescue Committee.

Dubed walks me toward a shelf in the back. It's stacked with spices he's purchased in bulk and divided into two-ounce see-through plastic containers. He lifts one filled with tiny black seeds. From another shelf, he pulls a small bottle that reads "Black Seed Oil." When I ask what it's for, he calls Mohammed over.

"Medical purposes," Mohammed says. "If you're feeling abnormal, like if you have diarrhea or gas. It's for cleaning out your system."

"For building your immune system," Dubed adds.

But the biggest seller at Far Janna is the meat.

"Goat meat and beef," Dubed says. "It's halal. That means when you kill the animal you say the name of God. And all the blood is drained out."

"Basically, you have to cut off the head." Mohammed laughs nervously, as though this is not a conversation one should have with a lady. "You can't shoot it or torture it. It has to be a straight, clean slaughter."

The beef and goat come from Australia. In two regularly scheduled deliveries, they receive over 1600 pounds of meat every week.

Mohammed lifts the lid on a standing freezer in the middle of the store and heaves out a thick plastic bag filled with 50 pounds of frozen cubed meat. "This is my job," he says. Then he pulls out another plastic bag, this one containing a 50-pound hunk of uncut meat. "This is round top. It's the back of the leg."

He opens the door of a large walkin freezer to point out the frozen-meat saw machine he uses to cube the meat. When I ask if anyone ever takes the leg whole, he smiles. "I have stick to drinks and phone cards. Dubed believes that when he

wish." Then he launches into a brief lecture about the importance of fully cooking meat before eating it, because dead bacteria become viruses.

Most of the Far Janna customers are Somali. The Mexican customers they do brings in someone to cook Middle Eastern food, it will draw in more people of every background. The pollo did. But that will have to wait until after Ramadan.

A woman in a hijab comes in, followed by a little boy. Mohammed









tends to them while Dubed grabs a catalog from behind the cashier counter. His plans, he says, are to add the Middle Eastern food and more 99-cent items.

"Like, this stuff is 69 cents and 72 cents, and we'll sell it for 99 cents," he says, flipping open the catalog. The page reveals toothbrushes for 39 cents, air-freshener and wrenches for 72 cents.

The work it takes to build this kind of a business is hard, Dubed admits. He's at the store 8:00 a.m.-9:00 p.m.

seven days a week and has been since his first day in town.

"I don't know anything about San Diego. I only know from here to Chase Bank. And the only people I know in San Diego are my customers. If I don't see them, I miss them."

To keep his customers coming back, he employs generosity. "I give away a lot. When they're happy, I'm happy.'

So far, after a year and a half, things seem to be going well.



the store, my goal is to make it bigger, but I never look at how much money I make and how much I lose. Most of my customers come at the beginning of the month. At the end of the month, if I see there's more money in my account than there was last month, and if the store has more

stuff than last month, it's good."

"I Need That"

Two blocks south of Far Janna Market, Luchia Lokonyen stands in the center of her 600-square-foot garden plot on a Friday evening in early July. While she waters her crops with a

garden hose, she points beyond her plot and the next one over, to a long strip of land overgrown with man-sized weeds. There are 84 other garden plots on this 2.3acre community farm. The weedy strip is the only section that has not been cultivated.

"I need that," she says.

She winks, but isn't joking. Luchia wants to build a business that her 600 square feet can't support. She punches me in the shoulder. "You ask the people."

By "the people" she means the International Rescue Committee, and more specifically, Amy Lint, the organization's former senior farming specialist — her go-to for most questions and issues regarding this vacant-lot-turned-community-garden at the edge of City Heights.

According to data gathered by the Kauffman Foundation, between 2009 and 2010, entrepreneurial activity rates increased both among those with less than a high school degree and among immigrants. A 2008 summary of research published by the Small **Business Association** asserts: "In California, immigrants are 34.2 percent of the new business owners each month." In San Diego, the International Rescue Committee helped open 40 new immigrant businesses during 2009 and 2010.

Luchia's skin glistens in the late-afternoon sun, but she seems unbothered by the heat. She waters the spinach while explaining how she found this little square of land and why she needs more.





dan native arrived in San Diego unable to read, write, or speak English. Soon after, she began to attend an English and literacy class at Marshall Elementary School. The class was part of the International Rescue Committee's First Things First program, for newly arrived immigrants. One day, Lint came in to recruit families interested in farming for a community garden project.

Lint later tells me over the phone, "The idea behind the garden was to help newly arrived refugees return to their agrarian roots. We wanted them to get comfortable with working the land here, and we thought it would also impact their food budget. Luchia was a great candidate."

This afternoon, Luchia points out the crops she uses most in her cooking.

"I make the spinach and *sukuma*," she says, aiming her chin toward the western edge of the garden. "I cook it with onion and oil. Sometimes we eat it with *ugale*. Sometimes with rice."

Ugale, she tells me, is cornmeal cooked in water. And when I ask which one of the plants is *sukuma*, she gestures

again in the same direction. "Over there. The green one."

Although I cannot distinguish between one green in her garden and another, Luchia doesn't specify further. The 35-year-old mother of five grew up among the Karamojong, an agro-pastoral people of Uganda, and although she never learned to read or write, she's been farming since age ten. She knows root vegetables and staple crops the way I know nouns and prepositions, and she laughs out loud when I cannot identify a small stalk of round buds whose name she

wants me to translate into English.

Although a year and a half in the making, the New Roots Community Farm received its final permits the same month that Luchia met Lint. By then, however, only three plots remained unclaimed. Luchia laughs as she relays her early enthusiasm for this plot of land she now tends.

"Amy speaks Swahili. She said, 'We're the IRC, and we help people. We have a garden.' She asked who speaks Swahili, and I said, 'Me!"

At the meeting, Lint asked those interested

to meet her at the farm the following day. Several people said they'd Lint says. "This was like a dream come true for her, and she wasn't







between the \$900 she receives in cash assistance each month and her monthly bills of \$965 (rent, phone, and electricity). And while she does usually receive \$800 in food stamps, this month her check was only \$600, because the agency is reimbursing itself after mistakenly giving her \$900 two months in a row.

Lint (who, since our conversation, has moved to Kenya to work on her own non-profit organization) has Luchia in mind for another program that would allow her access to more land on a five-acre farm in Pauma Valley.

"Luchia is dying to get into that program," Lint says, but because Luchia's English and literacy classes are requirements for receiving public assistance, she may not be able to participate in the training component of the farm program.

"Some case managers have been flexible," Lint explains, "and we've been able to exchange a few hours of job-training credits. Hopefully, Luchia will be able to make that transition."

In the meantime, Lint cannot give Luchia the weedy strip of land to cultivate because those "weeds" are native plants, and their removal is prohibited by law.

But Luchia continues her campaign. If Lint would turn over that weedy strip of land, Luchia says, she'd not only plant more crops and make more money, but she'd also help rid the farm of snakes.

"There's a big one in there," she says, wide-eyed. "Like a

the money is in techie start-ups.

This morning, Osman's van smells like mildew. Spray bottles of cleaning solution litter the passenger seat and the floor beneath the dashboard. The back is a tumble of hoses and buckets. Nothing in here beckons to thieves, and yet two weeks ago, someone broke the van's windows and took...nothing.

It wasn't the first time. When parked in front of Osman's City Heights apartment, his van, marked American Cleaning Experts, gets grafitti'd or broken into so often that it's no longer a surprise. Osman has taken to hauling his two floor-cleaning and polishing machines (both of which require two people to carry) into his apartment every night and back out to the van in the morning.

"I don't have to go to the gym anymore," he says with a resigned chuckle as he opens the back of the van and unwinds a length of fat gray-and-yellow vacuum hose that's patched together at the joints with duct tape.

The short Sudanese man works up a sweat in the 20 minutes it takes to set himself up for the task of steam-cleaning the carpets in the small, rectangular room of a house near 55th Street and College Grove. In the rising heat of a midmorning in June, he traipses back and forth from the house to the van, dragging first the vacuum hose into and through the house, then the vellow water hose, which he hooks up to a spigot on the side of the house, and finally, the blue generator plug, which connects to the

steam cleaner and heats the water.

Every time Osman goes in the house, the van remains wide open and vulnerable to thieves. As small as today's job is, if it were in City Heights, he'd pay a helper to keep an eye on the van. Recently, while he cleaned the floors of a City Heights home, someone stole the machine he uses to clean stairs. When a witness pointed out the thief to him, instead of contacting the police, Osman offered to buy his equipment back for

\$100. It worked. Now his policy is that every job in City Heights is a two-man job.

Before turning on the machine, Osman goes into the house

with an empty bucket. When he returns to the van, the bucket is full of water. He dumps in liquid from a red bottle, powder from the bucket on top of the genera-



tor, and then a cup or two of liquid from a spray bottle. He then stirs the new solution with a long metal rod and dumps it into the steam cleaner's water tank in the back of the van. When he turns on the machine, the loud sound sends the neighborhood dogs into a two-minute frenzy, and the vacuum hose begins to vibrate. Osman heads back into the house, his forehead dripping, and begins to clean the carpet.

While he'll never turn down a job in any neighborhood, Osman is looking forward to the day when he doesn't have to live in City Heights. Granted, the living is cheap (he pays only \$550 a month in rent), but as soon as

he can afford to live elsewhere, he plans to move. Although he believes personal safety is an issue (he has friends who have gotten beat up by neighborhood kids), Osman's main concern with living in City Heights is that he has nowhere to park the van to keep it safe from the neighborhood punks who break in or deface it with annoying regularity.

"I live in City Heights because I have no choice," he shouts over the sound of the steamer he pushes back and forth across caramel-colored carpet. "But if something better comes, maybe I'll move to Lake Murray or someplace else in La Mesa."

Osman arrived in

San Diego from East Sudan (via Cairo and Los Angeles) in 2001. The Catholic Charities Diocese in Mission Gorge helped him get settled with a place to live, \$300 in cash, and food stamps each month. They promised assistance for eight months, but by the end of his second month here, Osman had already found a security job for \$6.75 an hour and no longer needed the help. From 6:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m. every morning, he patrolled a downtown McDonald's, and nights from 11:00 p.m.-4:00 a.m., he patrolled Walgreen's.

In 2002, he met a Bangladeshi man whose name he does not remember — "It was a hard name" —



though the two became good friends. The man helped him land a security job at NBC, where he worked 3:00-11:00 p.m., starting at \$8.50 per hour. By the time he left in 2007, his pay was up to \$11 per hour. From 2005-2008, he also delivered newspapers from 3:00-4:45 a.m. This meant as much as \$1400 per month. In 2008, he began working for CPS, the security firm for whom he still works, 4:00 p.m.-midnight.

One day in 2003, the Bangladeshi friend brought along Osman to help him with a cleaning job he was doing with a family member. Nothing came of that particular job, and he never worked again with that friend, but it

gave Osman the idea to start his own cleaning company. A couple of years later, Osman's roommate directed him to the International Rescue Committee, where he applied for a loan. In January 2006, he received a \$10,000 check. With that loan, he bought small carpetcleaning and floor-polishing machines, business cards, and other supplies. Everything he needed fit into the trunk and backseat of his car.

Osman's first client was a woman named Sally, who at the time worked at the nonprofit that funded his new business. For \$225, Osman cleaned her Lemon Grove home twice a month.

"I cleaned the kitchen, the restroom,

vacuumed, all the cleaning. It only took maybe an hour [each time] because she didn't have kids, you know?" He chuckles at this.

For \$375 a month, he also cleaned the La Iolla home of an NBC lawyer twice a week. And he made \$550 a month for a five-daya-week office-cleaning job on Winona Avenue in City Heights.

Over the years, Osman's cleaning customers came and went, but he kept his security job and paid back the full \$10,000 to the International Rescue Committee within two years. He kept it moving even during economic downturns. When the cleaning business slowed in early 2010, he rented

space in a mechanic's garage.

"I was paying \$400 [per month] and cleaning taxis for inspection." He disconnects the suction hose from the steam cleaner and uses it to suck up what could be a few pieces of rice from deep in the carpet. "I did two or three cars every day, for \$45 or \$50 each car."

One of Osman's taxi customers told him he had a cleaning business that he had to give up due to old age and back pain. He had a van, he said, and bigger, better machines that he'd be willing to sell.

"I was negotiating from February. He said he needed \$9000. I told him I needed to see the van and take it to a place where they could check it. He said, 'No.' I said, 'I have to. I cannot put up \$9000 without seeing the machine. Then, later [the man] said, 'Give me \$6000.' I told him I have to fix this van and put money into it, and he told me, 'Okay, give me \$4500.'"

He smiles and slaps his thigh. "It was a good deal."

The negotiations had lasted until June.

On June 23, 2010, immediately following the purchase of his van, Osman drove straight to the ceremony that granted him United States citizenship.

Aside from onetime jobs (which average \$250 a month, except during May, during which they added up to \$3000), American Cleaning Experts currently has only three regular clients — two businesses and a private residence. Altogether, they add up to approximately \$1500 each month. It's a good start, but it's not quite enough to help him move out of City Heights and east to Lake Murray.

At the moment, the "something better" Osman is hoping for is a Walgreen's contract on which he recently bid. At \$1200-\$1600 per month for each of 35 stores, the contract would be a huge boost for his little company.

"If I get the contract, it will be a good year for me," he says.



Unforgettable

LONG-AGO SAN DIEGO

Of Miracles and Grave Misfortunes

It had to be a miracle! As Sebastián Vizcaíno's three ships neared the bay at Cabo de San José, a fog curtained the shoreline, and the ships separated beyond hailing distance. The old *Santo*

Tomás drifted to within 50 paces of a rocky Jeff promontory. Suddenly, the fog lifted. Sails and spars gleamed. As the

captain edged the lethargic galleon out to sea, mists thick as milk spilled back down.

The crew swore that the brief flash of sunlight, which saved at least 70 lives, must have been divine proof that Vizcaíno's exploration of the heathen California peninsula was on the right track.

It had taken the *San Diego*, *Santo Tomás*, and the *Tres Reyes* seven days to cross the Gulf of California, 50 leagues from Mazatlán to Cabo de San José. They anchored in the bay June 11, 1602. As crewmen furled the sails, clusters of natives began dotting the beach. Soon, at least 100 stood abreast, black and white markings beneath dark, top-knotted hair. They waved spears and bows. They shouted and threw sand in the air.

They had reason. When Hernán Cortés brought an expedition to Baja in 1535, he'd turned his dogs of war on the natives. Soldiers followed, cutting down men and women at random.

In a previous expedition to La Paz, Vizcaíno had infuriated the natives so much that the viceroy of New Spain

ordered him, this time, to "avoid conflicts with the Indians" on penalty of death. Vizcaíno must explore and chart the coast of California and find a har-

bor for galleons from Manila. No settlements, no searches for gold or black pearls.

As shouts from the beach grew

louder, Vizcaíno ordered each ship's small boat made ready. Thirty soldiers carried arquebuses — long, match-locked guns — with matches lit. They embarked with Vizcaíno, the captains, and three friars.

Seeing more and more men emerge from the giant brown vessels, the natives drew back to a hillock. Did these bearded strangers, with silver heads and deerskin coats, mean more harm?

On the beach, Father Ascensión, leader of the Carmelite friars, told young Father Antonio to ascend the hill alone and meet with the chieftains.

As he trudged up the sandy incline, Antonio made signs of peace — and to lay weapons down. The natives did, and he embraced the leaders. But when the friar called for the landing party, a chief said "no." They must lower arms as well.

Antonio made a strategic move. Expeditions from New Spain often used a person of color to make first contact. Antonio signaled a young black man to bring a wicker basket filled with biscuits. As so often happened, writes Ascensión, "the Indians were delighted to see him, caressing him very much and [making clear] they had some friendship and trade with some other Negroes."

Vizcaíno brought beads and small lookingglasses as gifts. The natives accepted them with suspicion and returned to their villages.

After posting sentinels, the landing party searched the area. Near the beach, surrounded by green cane brakes, they found a priceless treasure in time of need: a lake of fresh water. They hadn't refilled their supply in at least eight days and were running low.

Along with facing near-constant headwinds, one of the few certainties about the voyage ahead: much of the peninsula would be sterile or would have, at best, "green," undrinkable water. And since headwinds often postponed the next destination, fresh water would remain a necessity. The search consumed much time, writes Alberta Denis, and "water was carried in whatever would hold it and wherever it could be put — even in the rigging."

Across the bay, where surf beat against a rocky

promontory, foragers made another discovery: sardines, washed ashore by the thousands, making death-slaps with their tails on the sand. "So many and so good were they," writes Ascensión, "all those of the

fleet supped that night and dined the following day."

Instead of having to cast nets to find fish, writes Vizcaíno's diarist, with an eye for omens, "God granted that there should be...as many as all

could eat."

Pirates named the bay Aguada Segura because they could lie in wait for Spanish galleons in its "safe waters." From this bay, Thomas Cavendish had attacked the Santa Ana in

1595, the richest heist of

Though the viceroy ordered him not to rename sites, Vizcaíno dubbed the bay San Bernabé, after St. Barnabas, a minor disciple whose feast day is June 11.

The third Carmelite priest on the voyage, Father Tomás de Aquino, said Mass daily from a tent near the promontory. Masses, says Father Ascensión, were "a great spiritual solace for all, though I do not think the Devil received much pleasure from [them]."

Since the moon would

not change the tide for several days, soldiers washed clothes and took on wood. Some made new sails to replace those already worn out. Fishermen enjoyed constant sport, hauling in everything from salmon and red snapper, to perch, skate, sea bass, and bonito. Several times, the weight of a catch ripped the seine.

A giant devil ray, "17 spans" (a distance measured by a human hand) from head to tail, wrapped itself around an anchor cable buoy. Some feared that its half-moon-shaped mouth, a good seven spans

across, would sever the line, sending the *Santo Tomás* adrift. Instead, it tried to steal the buoy. It took several men to kill the monster, which clung to its prey like a fiend from hell. But the ray was so huge, a dozen men couldn't haul it to shore with ropes.

Along with hordes of fish, foragers found rabbits, hares, and signs of deer on essentially level terrain. They also found incense trees and a lagoon of salt. "But," writes Vizcaíno's diarist, in an afterthought that would haunt the expedition, "there was no fruit."

On June 16, Vizcaíno assembled his council. The next known port was Cedros Island, many leagues up the coast. If the ships separated, they would regroup at its leeward shelter. If the winds around the point at Cabo were "contrary," they would return to this bay.

They also agreed, writes Herbert Eugene Bolton, that "in order to avoid trouble with the natives, no landing must be made of less than 30 armed men; Indians must not be ill treated, nor presents received except by the commander of the landing party; orders must be obeyed on pain of death."

The waters along Baja, and winds above, are cold, made so by the California current. For people accustomed to 95-degree heat and high humidity, weather in the 60s felt like winter. So the leaders distributed warm clothing. The ever-suspicious Vizcaíno added an edict: "No one should gamble or sell" the heavy coats and other items "under pain of death."

The voyage began with a longboat. But the council declared it unfit to sail heavy seas, and a nuisance to tow or carry on board. They filled it with sand and

buried it in a small lake. They'd retrieve it on the return voyage.

At 4:00 p.m., June 19, the *San Diego* unfurled its sails and headed to sea on an outgoing tide. The *Santo Tomás* and *Tres Reyes* followed.

Just a few leagues from the bay, the northwest wind came up and almost snatched the vessels from the water. The *Tres Reyes*, a light frigate, froze, its flat, lateen sails flapping. The captain had to turn back. To keep the group together, the other ships returned as

During the next few days, the fleet made several more attempts to round the point and sail beyond the sight of the land. Each time the wind drove them back, as if by design. "The sea ran so high," writes Ascensión, "it seemed as if it was going to bury the land and swallow the ships."

From the tip of Baja, all the way up the coast, northwest winds prevail. Manila galleons heading south along the California coast had the wind at their stern. They "sailed downhill" to Acapulco, writes Richard Pourade. Ships heading north from Cabo would be "sailing uphill." They encountered not only roving mountains of air but

whirlpools, caused by the intersection of warm Gulf and cold Pacific currents.

Father Ascensión blamed a different culprit: "The Devil caused it all to hinder the voyage and [keep his] lordship over the souls of the natives of that great kingdom."

On July 5, the fleet made its fifth attempt. A land breeze favored them until they reached the high seas. Once again, the northwest howl hammered them.

From the San Diego, Vizcaíno signaled the other ships to keep tacking out to sea. The Santo Tomás followed. Two leagues beyond where they'd turned around before, headwinds calmed a little. Still both ships had to sail "on the bowline," as close as possible into the wind. The San Diego and Santo Tomás ploughed into oncoming waves, causing great bursts of foam, then skidded down the backsides. Masts tilted backward, righted themselves, tilted forward, like someone shaking an angry

But the smaller *Tres Reyes* was forced to turn around. As it reached the rocky promontory, conditions changed. It sailed north, this time hugging

Thinking the frigate was still behind them, the *San Diego* and *Santo Tomás* continued onward, both captains surprised by the force of even mild winds.

On July 8, unable to see the *Tres Reyes*, Vizcaíno decided to sail within sight of land. As the *San Diego* neared some high mountains, the winds died. So, strangely, did the current. It was as if nature's forces had shut down. For eight days neither ship could advance a single league.

"The currents stopped," writes Ascensión, "and when the wind began to blow, they began to run. The secret could never be made out. [Only] God knows the cause."

To commemorate this nautical limbo, Vizcaíno named the ridgeline Sierras del Enfado ("mountains of vexation").

On July 16, to free the expedition from the doldrums, the three friars prayed to the statue of Señora del Carmen, under a mantel at the bow of the San Diego.

As they chanted a litany, writes Ascensión, "a fresh, soft, and pleasant wind came up with which they escaped from such a tiresome place." The word *milagro* — miracle — made excited rounds among the

As they neared Magdalena Bay, a fog came up thicker than the one at San José de Cabo. Though he couldn't make out anyone seven paces away, Vizcaíno ordered his pilot to steer the San Diego into the "black fog." He wanted to see if the Tres Reyes lay anchored there.

Not wanting to repeat the near disaster at Cabo, the *Santo Tomás* stayed outside.

Vizcaíno entered the bay. Beyond the point, five fathoms deep, he found a large sand bar, several ports and anchorages — but no *Tres Reyes*. He ordered ensign Juan

Francisco to take four soldiers to a high hill near the northern entry. Send smoke signals to the *Santo Tomás*. Tell them the *San Diego* was safe.

The soldiers saw the *Santo Tomás* far offshore and built a bonfire. One signaled Vizcaíno, who ordered Bolaños, his pilot, to sail the launch out to the galleon. But the wind freshened, and Bolaños had to turn back.

The crew of the Santo Tomás saw the signals, writes Vizcaíno's diarist, but "they did not understand them." The galleon set sail for Cedros Island, the next known destination.

Three ships, who knew how many leagues apart: one anchored, one hugging the coast, the third heading out at sea.

Maybe what had happened at Cabo wasn't a miracle after all.



"I see these gimmicks, government trying to encourage banks to refinance, do short sales. But the market has to adjust to equilibrium." Prices should get low enough to attract buyers, including speculators who may buy or build a home and rent it out.

Nationally, the homeownership rate, or percentage of homes occupied by owners, has fallen from 69.2 percent in mid-bubble 2004 to 65.9 percent, according to Zillow Real Estate Research. San Diego's rate is a mere 54.1 percent, and "it could drop dramatically as the foreclosure process continues," says Cox.

He believes housing prices locally will fall another 5 to 10 percent over the next year. Thus, more speculators will buy homes that are seized by banks and discounted or sold at auction and turn them into rentals. That's another reason why government programs that prop up prices can be counterproductive.

According to the September issue of Market-Pointe Realty Advisors, the San Diego apartment rental market continues to show strength. Average rents peaked at \$1344 a month in the fall of 2008, then began dropping. They began picking up last year and now have bounced back to a new record high, \$1364 per month. Alan Nevin, who just joined the London Group as a principal, says, "Rents could go up as much as 4 percent this year. A year ago there were twoto four-week concessions on rent upon moving in. Those concessions have disappeared. Giving up one month of concessions is equivalent to 8 percent of rent."

Nevin is counting on San Diego gaining 15,000 to 20,000 jobs over the next year. "There are 50,000 San Diegans between the ages of 25 and 34 who during the recession went to live with Mommy and Daddy. Now

they are getting jobs, moving out, and renting."

But Cox and Cunningham are skeptical about that job growth. Cox notes that jobs appear to be growing, but then the statistics are revised and go negative. "Last year we went from jobs being up 15,000 to being down 10,000. Today's trend is not good."

Says Cunningham, "I thought I was being pessimistic early this year when I predicted slight employment growth. It's been lower than my low expectations. Growth has been stagnant at best." And government programs won't help, he says. ■

contributions to California politicos, but his firm, AEG, did contribute \$2500 to the Los Angeles County Democratic Party-Issues and Advocacy Committee.

Billionaire *Union-Tribune* owner **Tom Gores** isn't down for any federal contributions so far this year, but his brother **Alec**, also a billionaire, gave \$35,800 to the Obama Victory Fund 2012 and an identical amount to the Democratic National Committee on April 26.

Local billionaire Irwin Jacobs, who is lobbying hard to make over Balboa Park with a new road plan, gave just \$5000 in April to the political action committee of Qualcomm Inc., the company he founded. The PAC in turn distributed its cash to a variety of candidates, including GOP congressman Brian Bilbray, Democratic congressman John Dingell, the Democratic congressional and senatorial campaign committees, and Democratic senator from Alaska, Mark Begich.

Canyon Golf Course before heading for the intersection of Balboa and Mount Abernathy avenues. After crossing the 805, it travels north to Marine Corps Air Station Miramar.

The Navy has stored fuel on Point Loma since 1901, when Elihu Root, then secretary of war, set aside 360 acres of the Fort Rosecrans Army Reservation to the Department of the Navy to use as a coaling station. In 1932, storage tanks were placed on-site. By 1954, the pipeline connected the fuel farm to the Miramar air station. Today, 54 above- and below-ground tanks hold 100 million barrels of fuel.

In 2006, the Navy informed the public that approximately 1.5 million gallons of fuel had leaked from the aging tanks. Three years later, construction began to replace most of the tanks. However, Project 401, the largest construction project in the history of the Department of Defense, which the Navy claims will cost \$139 million, says nothing about replacing the pipeline.

"You put \$200 million to replace this fuel facility, but you're piecemealing this damn pipeline?" says Gilhooly. "It doesn't make sense."

In August, the Peninsula Community Planning Board issued a letter warning of the consequences if the aged pipeline ruptured. The letter was addressed to naval commanders, Mayor Jerry Sanders, Councilmember Kevin Faulconer, and senators Dianne Feinstein and Barbara Boxer.

"The best time to address high-risk petrochemical toxic spills is before they happen, before the environment is endangered," reads the letter.

Gilhooly, who helped draft the letter, believes only small segments of the

pipeline have been replaced. He has asked the Navy for maintenance records and for the design codes used to build the pipeline. He has requested reliability reports on pipeline segments. His requests have been ignored.

"There are a number of concerns, including seismic," says Gilhooly. "The seismic regulations in 1954 were next to nothing compared to those today."

The pipeline crosses what according to county documents is probably "the most significant potential earthquake source in the San Diego urban area," capable of a magnitude 6.75 to 7 earthquake.

But the Navy says the pipeline should last another 29 years.

"An optimization study was completed this May," writes Nannette Davis from the Navy's communications support firm. "The study concluded that the life cycle of the pipeline would be extended for another 29 years, with all routine inspections, maintenance and repairs to continue as planned."

In another email, a naval spokesperson said strict regulations are in place for the pipeline. "The Miramar pipeline is a Category I pipeline and is subject to an ultrasonic inspection every 5 years."

Ultrasonic inspections are conducted with tools called "smart pigs." The pigs, worth \$4 to \$5 million each. detect anomalies from inside the pipe. The last smart-pig inspection was in 2008 and cost more than \$8 million, including repairs.

In addition, a Navy employee inspects the pipe five days a week. When the pipe is transmitting fuel, an employee walks along La Playa beach every hour to check for leaks.

Gilhooly says he hasn't seen naval employees checking the pipeline. And as for the smart pigs, Gilhooly

"That pig thing is a joke,"

says Gilhooly. "The tools are good tools, but the pipeline was already worn when they calibrated the thing. They didn't run the pig until the pipe was more than 40 years old."

Adding to that, Gilhooly says that most private companies are required to send pigs down the pipeline once a year, not every five years.

Bill Bush, spokesperson for the American Petroleum Institute, confirms that the Navy has different standards. "If this is owned by the federal government," he says, "then they are in a different category for pipelines, and they are exempt from state and some federal regulations."

Despite assurances on the pipeline's condition, according to Councilmember Faulconer's office, a plan is in the works to replace the line.

Asked when the pipeline will be replaced, the Navy's spokesperson responded, "To be determined."

Ace in the Hole?

Will Big-Money Lobbying Win the Airport Parking Battle?

San Diego — Ace Parking has long had a virtual monopoly on running San Diego's publicly owned parking venues.

Insiders note that one key to the company's success has been staying friendly with local politicos and the judicious use of influential lobbyists.

Ace is currently vying with Chicago-based Standard Parking for the lucrative right to operate the lots at Lindbergh Field.

Both outfits have been pushing hard for their respective deals, but an examination of local campaign contributions gives ACE a big edge in the political money derby. According to the city's online campaign finance database, during the last four years, ACE employees have contributed a total of \$14,580 to candidates for city office.

City of San Diego records show that Ace is represented by Peterson & Price. In March of last year, according to the records, the firm's Matthew Peterson gave \$250 to the campaign fund of Democratic councilman Tony Young, a member of the airport board who has been quoted by the Union-Tribune as favoring ACE.

UPDATE: ACE beat out Standard for the contract. We'll follow up in the days to come.

Idea Replacement

City Council Responds to Assertion That New City Hall Is Unnecessary San Diego — The San Diego City Council voted 6-1 on October 4 to adopt a resolution responding to the San **Diego County Grand Jury** report that a new city hall is not needed.

Councilmember Todd Gloria, who made the motion to approve, said, "We have a substandard city hall; the building needs replacement."

The grand jury concluded that the city cannot justify a new 19-story. 576,000-square-foot facility with an approximate \$500-per-squarefoot cost (estimated at \$293,500,000). The grand jury determined the city could purchase "existing buildings of sufficient size to accommodate the City's needs" for approximately \$200 per square foot.

Hoi An, Vietnam By Derek Ray

Hoi An is about midway between Ho Chi Minh City and Hanoi up the Vietnamese coast. If you're traveling between the two largest cities in Vietnam, it is the perfect spot to take a break. It's also worthy of a visit on its own merits.

I stopped there for a few days to take a break from the Reunification Express train ride between Ho Chi Minh City and Hanoi. Hoi An turned out to be much more culturally interesting to me than the two larger cities and, ultimately, was my favorite stop in Vietnam.

In contrast to Ho Chi Minh City and

Hanoi, Hoi An is walkable. You don't have to dodge a dozen motorbikes when you cross the street like you do in the larger cities. You can rent a motorbike if you wish, but it won't be necessary if you stay in the city center.

Hoi An is also a much more relaxing city to explore — even the garbage trucks play music on pickup day. You can walk for hours perusing the shops and then stretch out on the beach or take a swim.

Most of the city's attractions are a few blocks apart in the Old Town area. The central market by the river gives a feel for how the locals interact. Get there as early as possible. Hoi An is shopping heaven for souvenirs, clothes, handicrafts, ceramics, and Asian art. Prices are low, and the shopkeepers are not shy about inviting you into their stores.

Hoi An is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. In the 18th Century, it was considered to be the most important trading town in Southeast Asia by Chinese and Japanese merchants. The influence of the Chinese and Japanese is evident in the architecture that characterizes the town. The Museum of Trade Ceramics provides a good introduction to Hoi An's history and culture.

Buy a ticket in Old Town that gives you access to five of the city's top historic attractions for just \$5. The most interesting visits for me were to the homes that had been passed down through as many as eight generations and combined influences of Vietnamese, Chinese, and Japanese architecture. Many of these buildings have been well preserved.

The Tan Ky and Hung Phung houses are a couple examples. In the latter, photos of several generations of ancestors adorn the walls and the family makes and sells sheets and pillowcases with intricate designs. Even though many of these homes are still occupied, families invite visitors in for a peek and photos.

If you like the beach, Hoi An has a lovely one just a few kilometers from the town center. To get there, you can walk,

hop on a taxi, or rent a motorbike. Taking a taxi is a preference for many visitors in Vietnam since they're so cheap.

The food in Hoi An is also a treat, and there are several local specialties. Be sure to try the white rose shrimp. Have lunch or dinner at the Blue Dragon with a nice view of the river and know that a percentage of your payment goes to a charity working with the local population of street kids.

A Guide to Unexpected San Diego and Beyond I by Jerry Schad

FROM THE TRAILMASTER'S FAVORITES FOLDER

Get good vibrations from the Kelso Dunes in Mojave National Preserve Originally published: June 7, 2001

Booming, roaring, barking, squeaking, and whistling sands have figured in folklore and travelers' tales for 1500 years, with the earliest references found in Chinese and Mideastern chronicles. Marco Polo describes encountering the phenomenon on a journey through the Gobi Desert; Charles Darwin mentions it while traveling through Chile; and it crops up in the writings of Henry David Thoreau.

Imaginative legends speak of the groaning of subterranean deities, of the incantations of ghosts, and of the chiming of bells in a sand-drowned monastery. In reality, the sound emanates from a peculiar vibration associated with sand flowing down the slip face (steepest face) of certain rare dunes and sand drifts known as "booming dunes." The nearest such dunes to San Diego are the increasingly popular Kelso Dunes in the heart of the Moiave National Preserve, east of Barstow.

Booming dunes are visually indistinguishable from normal sand dunes, but not so on a microscopic scale. Booming-dune sand grains are round

and polished, the result of being pushed and tumbled by prevailing winds over distances of dozens of miles or more. When such sand begins to flow downward, the grains vibrate in unison in some as yet not fully explained way. The surface of the dune around the sliding sand resonates with a sound reminiscent of old-fashioned propeller aircraft flying overhead.


Strong winds can trigger spontaneous cascades of sand, along with the attendant sounds. But even during quiet conditions, you can produce sounds to your liking by trying the following method, described by researcher A.D. Lewis while on an expedition to the Kalahari dunes of South Africa in 1935:

"By sliding down the slope in slow jerks on one's 'sit-upon'...a very loud roar is produced. In the still of the evening and early morning, natives kept sliding down the slope in this way, and the noise was easily heard at a distance of 600 yards, like the rumbling of distant thunder."

This and other even more imaginative techniques can be used while atop the highest crest of the Kelso Dunes, rising nearly 700 feet above the desert floor. Like all booming dunes, these will boom best in the warmest, driest weather so June is the perfect month. Plan to arrive late in the day, when the temperature sinks below 100 degrees. The hike to the top involves more than a mile of tedious slogging in soft sand, so don't forget to take plenty of water!

To reach the Kelso Dunes, drive 78 miles east of Barstow on Interstate 40. go north on Kelbaker Road for 13 miles. then turn west on a marked, graded road leading 3 miles to the trailhead. It's not virtue that leads me to the Exercises but pain. Only a flamethrower on my ass ever drives me to knock-knockon heaven's door. Pain, in my case, is the stole stimulus for righteous action. — from Lit, "The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius."

Mary Karr (b. 1955) is an American writer best known for her poetry and helping to start the renewed popular interest in memoirs with the publication in 1995 of The Liars' Club. Remaining on the New York Times' bestseller list for more

than a year, the book recounts her tough childhood spent in rural Southeast Texas in the 1960s. In 2000, she wrote a follow-up, Cherry, about her adolescence and early womanhood, and Lit in 2009, chronicling her complicated conversion to Catholicism.

Raw Experience

The most memorable pictures often entail misbehavior.

he plummy walls of the San Diego Museum of
Art give the exhibition they surround, From
El Greco to Dalí, a velvet jewel-case warmth.
If the rooms were full of Goya's ferocious Caprichos

or *Disasters of War*, or Miró's baleful work of the 1930s, or Picasso's unforgiving restlessness, well, then, all that warmth would fast fly out

all that warmth would fast fly out the ventilation ducts. But it's not that sort of show.

The pictures in From El Greco to Dalí, instructive, historically balanced, and occasionally exciting, belong to Pérez Simón, a Spanish-Mexican businessman born in Asturias who began collecting only 20 years ago, so the collection's limitations have been determined by market availability. He has a great passion for the art of his homeland, however, and the things on view, while sampling a few familiar masters, fill lacunae in our knowledge of Spanish art. Mr. Simón has been especially acquisitive of works by another Valencia native, Joaquín Sorolla (1863-1923), a painter virtually unknown here, and his general strategy has been to buy stuff that represents the progress of Spanish art from 15th-century panels to 17th-century Mannerist painting (critically shaped by Renaissance Italian art) up to the formal inventions of the 20th Century.

To judge by what's on view, after Goya's prolific, all-mastering expansiveness of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, Spanish painting — compared to what

was happening during the same period in the France of Impressionism and Symbolism — seemed to lose its nerve. It didn't find new excitements

until Picasso, the sculptor Julio González, and Miró came along. The late 19th Century in Spain looks a lot like the same period in Italy, when a group called the Macchiaioli (I'd loosely translate that as "daubers" or "mark makers:" "macchia" means stain, spot, mark) treated indigenous Italian subjects with sketchy, vaguely impressionistic technique. From El Greco to Dalí, like Macchiaioli painting, is top heavy with women and anecdote — women sewing, women milking cows, women gossiping at village fountains, and one swell duchess mounted on a horse (both costumed like parade floats).

The Spanish parallel to Macchiaioli painting was *costumbrismo*, which represented regionalist customs and scenes of daily life in a quickened but dense impasto. Sorolla made many pictures in the style, though he sometimes inflated the ethnographic

intimacy of *costumbrismo* into the monumentality of *Afternoon Sun*, where countrymen use three pair of oxen to tow a fishing boat to shore. Even in the small oil study included in the exhibition, you can see how Sorolla relished stormy sea spray and ribbons of ocean current. Much of his output looks to me like a mash-up of Manet, Degas, Boudin, and Cassatt. He's a deft and enthusiastic colorist who is easy on the eye and easy to like. You sigh with affection before his pictures, you don't gasp with surprise or astonishment or drop-dead delight. He's also an example of a historical turnabout: you see in his brushwork something of Manet's inflammatory handling, though Manet was himself critically shaped by Velázquez, Ribera, and Goya.

Spanish painting sometimes feels like raw experience just barely mediated by an artist's touch. I visited the Prado for the first time last year, and when I walked into the room containing Goya's *The Third* of May 1808, I felt physically shoved around, first by its dimensions (106 x 137 inches), which no book reproduction had prepared me for, but mostly by the brutality and merciless candor of Goya's depiction of the firing squad execution of rebels who resisted French occupation. (Manet's Execution of Emperor Maximilian comes straight out of Goya's picture.) It reminded me that the most memorable pictures often entail misbehavior, whether in the use of formal resources or in the treatment of subject matter. That said, Goya also was a court painter who made elegant, telling portraits, one example of which — Doña María Teresa de Vallabriga y Rozas — appears in the exhibition.

One of the finest things here is also one of the smallest, El Greco's *Head of Christ*. The Greek effectively became a Spanish artist because he spent 30 years of his career shuttling between Toledo and Madrid. Born in Crete, El Greco began as an icon painter, and the head from Simón's collection has the

stark presence of icon art, kneaded by the devotional emotionalism El Greco absorbed from Tintoretto during his years in Italy and gently stretched by his own signature manner. His Redeemer stares heavenward with stunned, porcelain eyes, apparently yearning without hope.

Another great Mannerist painter, Jusepe de Ribera, reversing El Greco's career trajectory, was born in Valencia province in 1591 but around 1608 left for Naples and made his life in Italy. He started as a Caravaggista, much indebted to the florid carnality and canted overhead light of Caravaggio. His 1648 Saint Jerome, however, shows off his individuated, free-standing manner. His hermit is so physically diminished that it's hard to distinguish Jerome's wrinkles and folds of flesh from body hair. His grubby, emaciated hands grasp close to his breast the traditional cross and skull. It's a portrait of piety in extremis. Like El Greco's Christ, Jerome looks yonder but without much expectation. Half his face gleams, the other half shrivels into darkness.

This show made me realize that I'll never like Ribera's near-contemporary Bartolomé Murillo. The misted contours of his saints and angels and putti and clouds and sheep and all the rest suggest the fluid harmonics of Andrea del Sarto, and, like him, he's Spain's equivalent to what Vasari called del Sarto, "the perfect painter." For me, though, his perfection is soporific. And his most notable follower, Alonso Miguel de Tovar, carried on the tradition in The Divine Shepherdess, where a peaches-and-cream Virgin Mary cozies up to sheep with flowers in their mouths. Two of the bouncy beasts, jaws locked down on roses, stare suspiciously forward as if daring us to giggle.

The secular pictures in the exhibition carry interesting information. An anonymous bullfighting picture from the 1650s doesn't look nearly as theatrical and organized as the *corrida* has come to

live in our imagination. Groups of spectators, students, and soldiers are neatly squared off, and action is scattered about the ring - toreadors, picadors, a bull and wounded horse, random participants brandishing swords, picks, and capes, plus a gaggle of priests (to administer last rites). Even when it's far from religious fervor and social bloodletting, Spanish painting carries a visceral surge. The fiery flower pictures of Bartolomé Pérez, for instance, are among the surprises in the exhibition. His razor-lipped tulip blooms look like instruments of predation, and the arrangements suggest the randy turbulence of the mythic figures painted on

Among the moderns, Mr. Simón has collected a few minor but choice Picassos. Two sketches show off the prodigious 22-year-old's pouncing, efficient energy. And the Cubist Still Life with Dove, executed in 1919 when Picasso's interest in Cubism had long been displaced by other preoccupations, is less clenched and studied than his earlier work: its planes are loose, floating, and soft. Along with the El Greco and Ribera pictures, the most bountiful moment in From El Greco to Dalí is Miró's Woman Before the Moon.

Ah, Miró of the finished line that never looks completed; of kited hands and faces and moons

and stars; of celestial amazement and the interconnectedness of things. A female beholding the moon recurs frequently in his work. In the picture here, the woman's head is shaped like a rearview mirror, her raised arms look like the parentheses of bulls' horns, and a pale green moon chevrons across the night sky. In the southwest and northeast corners of the picture, Miró applied ruddy pink and vaporous yellow, respectively, on canvas sanded down to suggest the pulverized hues of sunset and sunrise. It carries the DNA that makes Miró's art so irreducible — its visionary, humane, earthy grace. ■

Slow Food Fast

DINING

We were late heading out the door and needed to pick up dinner on the way to our friends Chuck and Rita's house to watch the Raiders on Monday Night Football (yes, dear readers, Emma G. is a Raiders fan). For most folks, there

would be no dilemma — stop at one of our fabulous taco stands and pick up burritos. However, Chuck really loves fine food, and we wanted to surprise him. What to do?

Driving up Market Street a few weeks ago, I noticed a little place called Urban Chicken on the corner of 25th. Chalked signs above the window advertised organic salads and chicken. My friend Allie had mentioned she'd been there and that it was fantastic. With those leads, I proposed to my husband that we check it out.

Walking through the front door is like entering a different world. The Gypsy Kings play softly on the stereo. Bold photos of Paris, London, and New York City emblazon the grassgreen walls; the six tables are a warm, dark wood; and the chalkboard theme continues with intriguing-sounding menu items loopily handwritten in a rainbow of colors. From behind the



cash register, in front of the open kitchen, our server smiled and welcomed us to step forward. Eating in Urban Chicken, especially during fall or winter, when it's not so hot — there's no air-conditioning in the restaurant — would

> be a lovely experience. Executive chef Flor Franco and her culinary team have created a wonderful neighborhood spot. However, tonight, we were on a mission to bring Chuck something unique.

The menu is simple: various sizes of grilled chicken dinners, chicken turnovers (\$7 for three with one sauce), sandwiches, soups, salads, and a Rice Nest with Lentils and Chicken and Roasted Vegetables (\$7.25). The sides include garlic-sesame jasmine rice, brown rice, mashed red potatoes, epazote black beans, seasonal grilled veggies, and organic salads. Just about everything comes with Urban Chicken's three dipping sauces: cilantro pesto, tomato cinnamon, or tequila chipotle. Such simplicity is deceptive, however, as we would find out. The prices are extremely affordable. A whole chicken dinner with three massive sides is \$22. We ordered two, along with an extra salad and turnovers for four adults and one child, and ended up with two more meals' worth of


When we arrived at Chuck and Rita's in University Heights, the TV was on and their stomachs were growling. Unveiling our feast, Chuck couldn't believe that such an impressive meal came from an unassuming place in Logan Heights. Aromas of garlic, cumin, and herbs wafted out of the takeout containers, making our mouths water. As Urban Chicken's menu notes, all their chickens are natural, free-range, fed a vegetarian diet, and raised without hormones or antibiotics. The vegetables and greens are locally grown, from places like Suzy's Farm. Biting into a thigh, I could taste the freshness.

much liquid for my taste. But my son devoured them. If you do order these, they require a dash of the fiery smoked chili salsa the server doles out in very small containers, as it is an incendiary experience. Finally, it's great to go to a takeout place that makes an excellent, healthy, and reasonably priced salad, chock full of mixed organic greens and served with a pleasant citrus vinaigrette (\$5). There's also a chef's special salad served daily for \$5.

As Chuck and Rita put it, Urban Chicken fills an important niche — "slow food served fast," as the sign outside the restaurant states. It's perfect for those nights you don't want to make dinner but long for something you might cook for yourself at home. ■

Jamaican Promise

"Bacon, avocado, cheese... Back in Tunis, Brittany, they'd freak out at that."

he sun slants in through the venetian blinds, casting angled stripes across Christine's arms and face. She's wearing a striped

dress, too, so it's kinda cute. She's chatting away with her old school buddy, Cathy, while they nibble at their savory crêpes.

It's early evening up here in North Park. I've seen this modestlooking li'l place time and again from the number 2 bus. Figured it was time to check it out.

The sign over the door reads: "Delicious French Crêpes. La Crêperie French Restaurant."

Inisde, it looks magical. Maybe it's that slanting light from the sun. It's a small room with the counter cutting it in two diagonally, so the three or four tables have to fit into a triangle. But mirrors and goldy yellow and ruby painted walls keep it open and cheery.

I spot the two gals before I see Sami, the crêpe master behind the counter.

"Good?" I ask them.
"Really good," says
Christina. "And good
for you. Lots of spinach.
Iron. I'm eight months
pregnant. Need that."

Wow. Who'd think of spinach and crêpes in the

same breath? I check the large board menu hanging on the wall above the counter. Spinach...she's having either Popeye's Revenge (with spinach, avocado, cheese, and garlic, \$8), or the Vegetarian Knock-Out (with mushrooms, tomato, spinach, and cheese, \$8).

Christine tells me this is kind of a reunion for her and her long-lost friend. Cathy nods and grins. She's downing a California Surfer crêpe (with bacon, cheese, and avocado, \$8). Predictable ingredients, but it smells awesome.

I head for the counter and face Sami. He looks familiar.

"Farmers' markets?" he says. "We've been

making crêpes in most of them for six years. Hill-crest, Little Italy, Temecula, all over the county. For as long as we've been open here."

That has to be it. Bet I saw them in Escondido.

The menu divides crêpes into savory and sweet. Savory has things with very un-French names, such as Porky's Favorite (stuffed with ham, mushrooms, and cheese, \$7), Pacific Catch

(tuna, spinach, onions, cheese, \$8), and Green Hen (breast of chicken with avocado, tomato, cheese, \$8). I don't look at the sweet crêpes, 'cause I know I'll be tempted. But, heck, can't miss with bacon, avo, and cheese: the California Surfer it is.

"Number one," I say.

Sami makes quite a show. He grills the bacon and cheese on one hotplate, pours the crêpe onto the other, then a big scoop of guac. He folds the

crêpe in half, ladles the bacon-cheese in, makes a cornet shape, and, voilà. It's hot, tender, tasty, like a delicate burrito. Or a sandwich with bread you've just baked.

But what really excites me is the idea that, in Tunisia, where Sami's from, they've been eating these things since before the

Romans invaded, 2000 years ago. So, with all our new products and processes and miracle diets, here I am eating one of man's ancient foods. I bet Cleopatra offered one of these to Antony. Maybe in aspic, heh-heh.

In Europe, Sami says, Brittany, in northern France, was the first place to make a big deal of crêpes. They called them *galettes de Sarrasin*, after the Crusaders brought back buckwheat from the Holy Lands, where they'd been battling the Saracens. They found that buckwheat grew better than wheat in the poor soils of Brittany.

"We're eating history here," I say to Sami.
"Well, not quite," he says. "These crêpes are

totally Americanized. The names, the things we put in them. Like yours, bacon, avocado, cheese. Back in Tunis, Brittany, they'd freak out at that. There, crêpes are smaller, simpler, thinner, unchanging, traditional. Maybe ham and cheese, but that's about it. And on the sweet side, sugar, perhaps; or Crêpe Suzette, with caramelized sugar, butter, OJ, and a splash of Grand Marnier liqueur, plus brandy to set alight on top. That's the showpiece. But, really, you can put anything in a crêpe. It's just a vessel."

My only struggle is blocking out the sweet side of the menu. Hmm...the simple sugar and lemon or cinnamon crêpes are just \$4. So is the chocolate crêpe, and the Crêpe Confiture (with jam). The

Jamaican Promise, with banana, rum, chocolate, and cream, costs \$7.

Oh, Lord. I scrabble through ye olde wallet to see if I have enough for a second crêpe. Yes! Just.

Then my pocket vibrates. Cell phone.

"Crêpe Suzette?" Carla asks.

Women. Incredible timing — earlier, she wanted to know where I was headed, and I blabbed

"No, babe," I say. Might as well tell all. "I'm looking at something called Summer Blush." It's \$7, and almost like Crêpe Suzette, but with strawberries, Grand Marnier, cream. "Can you handle that?" I ask.

"On one condition," she says. "You've got to promise to keep your grubby hands off of it."

I promise.

I'll just sit there with big eyes, waiting like a dog. She'll crack. \blacksquare





Yu Me Ya!

The word *vumeva* means "house of dreams" in Japanese, and that is what one family created in Encinitas, with Yu Me Ya Sake House, about six years ago.

More recently, the family ("Dad, Mom, and two sisters") opened up a second shop in Hillcrest, on the corner of Fourth and University. My man and I are heading to Tokyo on a food tour in a few days, and we wanted to get our oishi on early.

We went for ramen, because there's a huge sign hanging out-

side that claims "killer ramen" is inside, but it turns out ramen at Yu Me Ya is only on Friday and Saturday night between 9 p.m. and midnight. I almost turned around, but then I noticed the extensive sake collection, the funky decor, and the warm attitude emanating from the man behind the counter (not a member of the family, but a thoroughly informed and appropriately dispositioned front-ofthe-house gentleman).

At our server's suggestion, I began with a Coedo. I chose the Beniaka, one of the five flavors. It's made from sweet potatoes in the northern part of Tokyo. Lightly sweet, with a full, sweet potatofinish, it's an appetizer in itself.

Because we had a few minutes left of happy hour, we ordered some of the "hot tapas." The kurobuta sausages were yummy, flavorful little wieners worthy of Nathan's, served with a simple mustard. David also ordered some fried bits - shrimp and pork on sticks, in the Yakitori

But I had a hankering for something soupy. Fortunately, though ramen wasn't available, there was udon noodle soup on the menu. The udon is made fresh in-house, daily, and I could tell. The broth was light, sweet, and satisfying. I ordered the udon with marinated tofu, which was also on the sweet side. David got the shrimp tempura, which came with more than shrimp, a nice surprise.

The place is warm and inviting, the servers and cooks are smiling and helpful, and we could tell the owners take their food seriously. I can't wait to go back late on a Friday night and try the ramen.

Brazen BBQ Is Smoke-a-licious

After driving by to check out the extensive renovations being done on the restaurant space on the corner of Fifth and Washington in Hillcrest and then driving by and catching whiffs of smoked meat, I finally got a chance to stop in to Brazen BBQ Smokehouse & Bar for lunch yesterday.

My thoughts during the weeks of waiting for this place to open were along the lines of, With all the effort they're putting into the design of this place, I hope the food lives up to the look and that they do well. From landscaping to signage to interior, a lot of investment was spent here. And I'm happy it was, because the look of the place, the feel of it, is all part of the experience.

Two chefs and friends for seven years — John Bracamonte and Brad Thomas - began competing at cooking events in 2009,

taking home award after award (trophies and ribbons are showcased around the restaurant). They decided to open a restaurant in John's hometown (he grew up in Escondido). Some of the meat will smoke for up to 24 hours before it's served. Because it was our first time, David and I opted for a tasting platter — three meats, three sides. We followed the cashier's recommendation and got the brisket, pulled pork, and ribs.

BBQ sauce is available on the side, rather than mixed with the meat, and for good reason: the meat itself is so flavorful and well rendered — crispy on the outside, tender on the inside — it really doesn't need sauce. But I'm a sauce girl, so though I enjoyed several bites without, I did try out the two BBQ sauce varieties. Both were sweet and tangy and complemented the meat.

I would have liked to have seen a third sauce, one with spice, because there's not any kick to the two. Sure, there's Tabasco, but it's not the same as having the burn incorporated into the sauce.

My favorite of the sides was the "ancho spiced baked beans." They did have a chili kick and that familiar, complex sweetness that goes so well with smoked meat.

I also liked the "smoked kernel corn medley" — again, it was sweet and spicy.

The "crusty macaroni & cheese" was okay, nothing stellar, but it was nice and crispy on the outside, creamy on the inside. With all the other flavors on the table, the mac 'n' cheese was just a bit too bland for me.

The platter came with cornbread. I loved the spice (I'm guessing jalapeño) in the bread, but it was on the dry side. It would be perfect with just an extra hint of moisture.

Over all, we were stoked on the smoked. There are so many other items on the menu that I look forward to tasting. Everyone around us had sandwiches, which were piled high with toppings such as fried jalapeños and caramelized onions. I'm curious





There, glowing in the dark like a mother ship from beyond the clouds, she sits. El Salvadoreño. Pupusa Central.


Kinda varnished golden inside. Looking warm, dry, and, even with it being a rainy Wednesday night, abuzz.

Plus, huge black-and-white photos of places like the presidential palace in San Salvador. A Bible's open at a page highlighting a text. A wooden plaque has been chiseled: "Welcome, Bienvenidos!"

Luis, a Salvadoreño chowing with a bunch of gringo friends, says this is definitely the best pupusa place in town. And because it's late (gone eight), I order what he's having.

Also because it looks so fabulous. Big square platter loaded with pupusas, tamales, enchila-

das, sour cream, frijoles, fried sweet plantain, and yucca.

Not cheap. It's the \$16.99 sampler platter. But I figure this is for two, and I'll take most of it home.

It's all delish, 'specially the pork-and-cheese *pupusa*. Thick, generously stuffed oval tortilla, basically. Tang it up with a touch of salt and dip it in the sour cream...heaven.

Also, the deep-fried ground-beef *pastel*. Actually, most everything is fried. They have hot sauces in bottles, but as Francisco says, heat's not a Central American thing.

I eat maybe a third, plus glug a nice bottle of Salvadoran Goya Cola Champagne soda (\$2.25).

As long as I can get it home through this rain, me and Carla's got a midnight feast a-comin'.

This month they're screening Rocky Horror (and hoping to get the cast from the Old Globe to come by). Okay, the food. David got the "potato chip chicken benedict," which came on "artisan bread" that was English-muffin-esque. The benedict was great, but though the potatoes looked like they might have been good at one time, they weren't crispy and were somewhat cold.

GARDEN VEGGIE LASAGNA

RECIPE BY DANIEL MANRIQUE

Executive Chef, the Red Door

To tell you the truth, my mother wasn't a good cook. I started to cook for my little sister by the time I was nine or ten. I'd make sandwiches or nachos when we came home from school. Or if we didn't like the dinner my mom made, I'd go to the fridge and throw something together.

When I was 21, I decided to turn my passion into a career and I went to culinary school at the California Culinary Academy. I started my career at Parallel 33 (now closed) and then came to the Red Door as a sous chef and worked my way up under former executive chef Brian Johnson. I wanted to work under someone with experience and skill and he taught me so much.

I don't want to label

myself yet as a chef because I don't want to lose my open mind. I'm young and I am still trying to find my niche. There are so many great things out there and I don't want to limit myself. What's exciting for me now is that at the Red Door, I am using vegetables that we grow ourselves in our half-acre garden on Mount Helix. Every day in the summer, we featured a dish from the garden — like a vegetable pot pie or garden lasagna — and we're going to keep that up this fall as well.

My grandmother was an amazing cook, and she inspired me. I'm Filipino, but I hardly ever cook Filipino food because I can't make it as well as my grandmother could. It's frustrating for me. When I am home, I love to cook fish and seafood. I'm excited to use anything that is fresh and in season. I try to experiment at home and, often, these experiments make their way into the restaurant. Food to me is like a playground. That's how I learn.

The mimosas were served in a jar with a twist — it's actually called the "redneck wine glass," a jar atop a candlestick, and we all admired the concept.

I got the winner on the table and was loathe to share — potato chip chicken and waffle. Just how it sounds, the chicken is coated in crunchy potato chips (that stayed crunchy), served in tenders atop

a flavorful waffle. We all agreed that if we go back for breakfast, that's the dish to get.

Like Hansel in Zoolander, the Range's concept is so hot right now (cage free, grass fed, craft beer, local wine). I need to go back and check out the regular, non-breakfast menu. Even though I'll probably just end up ordering the potato chip chicken in a basket.

Iris Bringing Food and Spirit to the Cooking Channel

I watch way too much television, but much of it is related to dining and the culinary arts, so when I'm particularly couchpotato, I try to tell myself it's business-related.

Being a frequent viewer of programs on Food Network, Cooking Channel, Travel Channel, etc., it's nice to see more San Diego establishments getting their big moment on the small screen. Best of all, it's usually places that locals don't hear about all that much, either because they are off the beaten path or they've been around doing a good job for so long that they're no longer considered new and "fresh."

A restaurant that falls into that second category is Iris





HOW TO DO IT

To make the marinara sauce, heat the olive oil over low to medium heat in a large sauce pan and sauté garlic and onion until the onion is soft and transparent. Deglaze with red wine and reduce by half, then add the plum tomatoes. Cook for 45 minutes on low simmer. Add chili flakes and basil. While the sauce is

simmering, cook lasagna noodles according to package directions or make homemade pasta. Set noodles aside. Next, mix the cheeses in a bowl.

Heat up 2 tablespoons of olive oil and sauté the sliced eggplant on medium heat until browned. Cook in batches to avoid overcrowding the pan. Set aside. Heat up remaining 4 tablespoons olive oil in a

large sauté pan and add the mushrooms until about halfway cooked. Then add garlic, dried oregano, and other veggies. Cook the veggies to half-doneness, set aside and let cool.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. In a 9"x11" casserole dish, add a thin layer of the marinara sauce, then add the cooked pasta sheets, a layer of the veggie mix, sprinkle a layer of the cheese mixture, and a layer of the sauce and another layer of pasta. Repeat the layering process by topping a pasta layer with a layer of marinara and top with the cheese mixture. Cover with foil and bake in a preheated oven at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes.

Food and Spirits in Del Mar. The Cooking Channel agrees. Iris and owner Tommy Golden's method for cooking up lamb ribs will be featured on a show called United Tastes of America on October 11 at 7 p.m.

"The most exciting part of the filming was being able to teach at least one important cooking process to people, in this case, brining," says Golden. "We are big on using all kinds of foodpreserving methods.

"We cure, confit, pickle, and can tons of the stuff on our menu. The most challenging part was being a bit nervous that I would get things right, but in the end we did it all in one take...they told us that rarely happens. Once I got to be in my natural space behind the line cooking, it made a big difference."

During the taping, Golden drew off his experiences leading classes at Great News, the Kitchen Witch, and other local educational venues. He also offers private in-home cooking classes to epicures looking to take some lessons from him in person. He prefers those because

they are much more hands-on than larger group settings.

Mulita Class on Golden Hill

Chop chop chop chop...

You can hear it all around the crossroads. It's Danny, chopping up the marinated pork meat they're going to be grilling right here in the gas station parking lot.

Keep coming back here to 25th and C because this dogleg is a little jewel. The number 2 bus turns left off Broadway, up 25th for one block, then right onto C. And like an eddy in the stream, it collects interesting people and more interesting places than I'd given it credit for.

Like, right now, about eight at night, I've just come out from the Krakatoa, running, as usual, because I heard the bus trundling west toward me. Then, dang! Bus gets the green light, I get the red. It's gone, heading downtown.

"Another one in 15 minutes," says this guy sitting on the electric box next to the bus stop.

That's when, in the silence after the bus goes around the corner, I hear it.

Chop chop chop. I mosey back to the T-junc-

tion. Amazing transformation going on. Guys whipping up blue tent, white tables, black tablecloths, plastic chairs. Getting a brazier going. Turning on romantic ranchero music at La Nueva 106.5.

"Well be ready in two minutes, sir," says this guy. Israel.

And two minutes later I find myself at the head of a crowd of people who've magically appeared out of the gloom. We stand in the delicious smoke as Danny and Israel grill pork and carne asada right here in front of us.

"Usually my parents would be doing this," says Israel. "We're the Dos Amigos taco shop in El Cajon [719 East Bradley]. But these are hard times. My dad's landscaping business dried up, and mom's daycare business kinda died. So we went looking for a place to do extra taco business. Now we're here every night. Except tonight I've given them the night off."

He says the main thing that keeps people coming is the marination. "I marinate all our meat for three days before I bring it. You need that long for the flavors to soak in properly."

Israel tells me and Jackson, the guy behind me, another firsttimer, to go for the mulita.

"The Little Mule.' It's two corn



tortillas with cheese grilled onto them and carne asada or pork meat between. You can't beat it."

Regular tacos — carne asada or *al pastor* — are \$1.50; *mulitas*, \$1.75.

I order the *al pastor mulita*. Pork. Lickety split, he hands it to me hot and steaming.

I go to the little rack of fixins, stick in chopped onions, cilantro...and then come up against the question I face every time.

"Israel: which is better for pork? The red chili salsa or the green?"

And he gives me an answer I can — at last! — remember.

"It's like wine. Red for red meat, white for white meat. Except here it's the green salsa for white meat, like pork or chicken."

Aha. It's been worth coming just for that.

I've just sat down at the black tableclothed table near the gas pumps and taken one flavorful bite when...aargh! I hear that low diesel grunt. The number 2.

Dang! Jump up. Wrap everything. Here we go again. Chop chop!

Beer and Cider Meat Their Match

A few months back, I mentioned the chilly beer cave at Mission Valley's Iowa Meat Farms. Today, I'm happy to report the meat-

mongers in the back of the shop have upped their devotion to craft beer. Instead of just stocking it, they're using it as an ingredient in their house-made bratwurst.

Their beer of choosing is Old Viscosity, a thick, roasty ale aged in oak barrels at Port Brewing's San Marcos facility. It's mixed in with pork shoulder, marjoram, coriander, and a variety of undisclosed seasonings to create a \$7.99 per pound brat that's worth a slightly higher price in return for added quality.

I stumbled across the Old Viscosity Pork Shoulder Brats last month at Iowa Meat Farms' booth at the San Diego Beer Festival. I was drawn like a moth to a flame by a bottle of Old Vis', but happily stuck around to sample the sausage.

Usually, bratwursts have plenty of porkiness but don't come through with the defined, potent flavor profile of stronger seasoned sausages such as linguica, andouille, or chorizo. By adding the beer and their blend of seasonings, they've created bratwursts that don't need gussying up with mustard and 'kraut. They come on strong all on their own or in a bun and topped with condiments in traditional Oktoberfest style.

They're also giving a nod to the county's apple capital by mixing Julian Hard Cider into the blend for their wild boar sausages. Built to bring a good deal of autumnal appeal, they also incorporate dried apples, rosemary, and sage. The going rate for these links is \$3.99 per pound. Not bad for wild boar.

The brats and the sausages are available at Iowa Meat Farms (6041 Mission Gorge Road) and their sister butcher shop, Siesel's Old Fashioned Meats in Bay Park (4131 Ashton Street).

I'm getting the Ubehebes here. I've come out on deck from the

counter inside, loaded with a coffee (\$1.75), here at Krakatoa, the old-house-turned-coffeehouse in Golden Hill (1128 25th Street, 619-230-0272, just up from where 25th and C Street meet).

And, man, even at night, maybe especially at night, this is a patio. Deck, fig trees thrusting up through it, lights scattered among the branches, glowing gold and white, people at tables murmuring, laughing, slurping coffee, bamboo rustling...

There's a sidewalk a few yards out through this jungle, but totally a world away. The next moment, here comes Hannah, the funny counter gal with my "Fuego."

It's a cream cheese everything bagel with jalapeño bits and cheddar (\$3.25). It's hot, crispy, nicely loaded, and, uh, hot. As I'm chew-slurp-chewing away, I get talking to Brian at the next table with his buddy Andrew and another guy. Brian's a regular, he says. He looks at my bagel.

"What you've got's okay," he says. "But, totally, you've gotta have the Ubehebe."


He doesn't even wait. The guy's gone in to buy one. See from the menu it's a turkey, bacon, cream cheese, and cranberry sauce sandwich with potato salad. Costs \$7.75.

"This is what you want," he says a couple of minutes later.

"Tell you what, I'll split it," I say, laying a Lincoln down on the table. I'm wondering what I'm doing, but first bite, it's so worth it.


The turkey with the bacon's a great combo, but what makes it sing is the sweetness of the cranberry. This is delicious. Turns out "Ubehebe" is a volcano crater in Death Valley. The word means "big basket in the rock" in local Timbishi language. All sandwiches here are named after volcanoes. Have to say, this one's a bona fide taste explosion.

Overdue at the Library

Lou Curtiss opened Folk Arts Rare Records on Adams Avenue more than 30 years ago. Over the years, he's promoted folk concerts at SDSU, coffee shops, and, later, the roots festivals staged in the street in front of his shop. Too busy to

"I'm working right now on digitizing the Tenth Annual Folk Festival," Curtiss says. "Utah Phillips is the one doing the singing." That was 1976,

The project began in 2007, when the Grammy Foundation awarded Curtiss a \$35,000 "archiving and preservation grant," after which he and his partner in digitizing, Russ Hamm, began burning CDs.

Starting at the beginning, they got through the year 1975 before the grant money ran out. "We've got about 2000 tapes left," Curtiss says, "and that doesn't include the video."

Curtiss is not entirely sure whose idea it was to digitize his concert tapes for the library, but now he's deep into it and needs more money to

He produces a check made in the amount of \$750, sent as a donation from a Colorado businessman. "There's been no corporate interest in this project at all in San Diego." How much will it cost to complete the digitizing? Curtiss says he doesn't know. Donations arrive at the shop in dribs and drabs, enough to keep the project alive, but Curtiss says he fears the ticking of an even bigger clock.

"I'm worried," he says. "I'm not getting any younger."



After receiving classical training at Stagedoor Manor (alumni includes Robert Downey Jr, Natalie Portman, and Zach Braff) and Appel Farm Arts and Music Center in New York, he performed in plays and musicals such as Guys and

there every summer, so I grew up being babysat by people who were the basis for many characters in his movies."

While living in Hawaii, Goode cofounded the group that eventually became Ghoulspoon. After relocating to San Diego in 1991, the band evolved into Divided by Zero, which split in 2006, leading to Goode's newest groups: the Secret Seven (whose debut full-length was nominated Best Rock Album at this year's San Diego Music Awards) and Geezer (SDMA Best Tribute nominee 2010 and 2011).

"I'd definitely consider doing more theater, but it's hard to commit to a production being in two bands," he says. Or keep up with current theatricals. "Until recently, all I knew about Rent was the 'Everybody has AIDS' joke from Team America: World Police!" - Jay Allen Sanford

Not Neighborzly. Bassist Jay Crew says he walked out of reggae band Bad Neighborz last year because lead singer Erik Trogisch was mangling his songs. "Erik screams in the mic. He has no dynamic control. Erik would say, 'You can't tell me how to sing.' So, I just left. I took what I wrote and split to find a professional singer."

Bad Neighborz took on a new bassist, changed its drummer, and renamed itself Sunny Rude. Crew took the discarded Bad Neighborz name for his new three-piece.

Now there is a custody battle over three songs that Crew says he cowrote.

"I wrote the melody, choruses, and guitar and bass parts," says Crew. "Erik wrote the lyrics.... I suggested each band give the other band credit for these three songs on their records."

Bad Neighborz credited Sunny Rude on the initial printings of their CD (coincidentally called Sunny D), but Sunny Rude will not credit the Neighborz on their soon-tobe-released Rudimentary. (The three songs have different titles on each album.)

"They disrespectfully



make street-level music for the people," says alt-country crooner Chad Cavanaugh. In 2008, the North Park singer/guitarist says he was surprised at his Best New Acoustic Art-

ist nomination for that year's San Diego H.A.T. Awards (Honoring Acoustic Talent). Surprise turned to apprehension when he was invited

to perform "Dead Man Walkin" at the ceremony.

"As I sat down to perform my song, I noticed all my strings had been detuned. As I tuned them up, I got to the B string, and it snapped. The whole crowd shuddered, 'D'oh!' I looked at the string and said, 'Screw it, I don't need that string anyway,' which drew a roaring approval."

In addition to circulating the S.D. coffeehouse and house-party circuit, Cavanaugh posts a prolific amount of heartfelt solo performance videos on websites such as YouTube and SoSayWeAllOnline. com, usually seen by himself or at intimate venues, earnestly pouring out his autobiographical and frequently melancholy — okay, depressing — ballads.

"The first song I ever wrote on my first guitar was actually *called* 'Depression'.... It's a darker song, coming from a darker period in my life when I had first become sober and drug-free." Lyric sample: "I am in a precarious situation/ I don't know how to escape my state of depression."

Cavanaugh's first recording, *The Coffeehouse Rebellion*, was released in 2009. He's recording a new full-length at a converted South Park garage known as Dfab Studios. He'll likely perform many songs from that release when he appears at Lestat's on Thursday, October 20.

HOW ARE YOUR PANDORA STATIONS SET?

1. Cypress Hill. "I've been a big fan of them since I was in the Army in the early '90s. I grew up in a predominantly Latino environment, so I can identify

with it."

2. Facundo Cabral. "I only found out about this Argentine composer after his murder. I don't fully under-

stand what he was saying, as my Spanish is spotty at best. I've read up more on him and found him to have led a fascinating life."

3. Dubstep. "It's a fun departure for me."

4. Eminem. "He reminds me of a present-day Dr. Seuss for adults. The way he strings words together in his particular meter and cadence sets him apart for me. Not sure how he does it without taking a breath."

5. Dubliners. "I'm of Irish descent. My great-grand-father came from County Carlow and worked in steel. He was a foreman for the construction of the Golden Gate Bridge, so Irish music is something that fuels my soul. It transports me to a different time and place when I hear it."

WHAT KIND OF MUSIC WAS YOUR DAD INTO?

"My dad had Abba, KC & the Sunshine Band, the Village People, Louis Prima, the Highwaymen, Waylon and Willie, the Kiss albums, Simon and Garfunkel, Anne Murray, Harry Chapin, *Hooked on Classics...* The mix was seriously diverse. Our road trips were always capped off with Wagner's 'Ride of the Valkyries."

WAS THAT EMBARRASSING?

[Laughs] "I don't think any of them are embarrassing. It took me awhile to realize that I don't have to be embarrassed about anything that I like personally, because it's about what I like, not about what other people think I should like."

WHO DO YOU HANG OUT WITH?

"As a father of three little girls, I don't go hang out much unless I'm performing. They're my day job."

FAVORITE LOCAL PERFORMER?

"Seeing Robin Henkel play. That guy, I truly believe, is from a different era. He's a Mississippi Delta bluesman, an old Chicago juke-joint player. He brings you to a different time and inspires you to greatness."

FIRST TIME DRUNK?

"I'm the youngest of four, and I was the guinea pig for my oldest sister and brother. I was eight, and they had me drink a six-pack of Coors in the New Mexico summer sun. My sister thought it was funny...until I started throwing up everywhere."

FIRST PET?


"A dog named 'T-Shirt."

In the song "California," Erika M. Anderson sings, "Fuck California, you made me boring," It's the lament of a Midwesterner who moved out West and did too much living, too fast and too young. Now she's back home and trying to figure out if she can live without all that excitement, even though it almost killed her. It's more than a little self-indulgent, but it's also part of a long tradition of rock songwriting. At one point Anderson apologizes to a couple of ex-friends by name, at another she paraphrases Bo Diddley. ("I'm just 22, I don't mind dying.") Past Life Martyred Saints, Anderson's debut

release as EMA, is full of songs like this: tales of bad drugs and lethal romance. (Check out the one where she sings, "I wish that every time he touched me left a mark.") Anderson lived for a time in Oakland and played in a couple of noisy bands, Amps for Christ and Gowns, before a bad breakup sent her back to Sioux Falls. South Dakota. She went home thinking she'd given up music, but it didn't take long before she started writing the songs that she would perform as

EMA. Anderson set them all to squealing guitar feedback, distorted organ, booming drums, and her own wounded but strangely pretty voice.

Past Life is produced with lots of reverb and slightly distorted vocals, so that even the sparse, slow "Anteroom" and the a cappella "Coda" sound almost as ominous as a stomper such as "Milkman." Better yet are the songs



like "The Grev Ship," which starts off slow and sparse and builds up guitars, drums, and keyboards until it's an overwhelming force.

The Bronx frontman Matt Caughthran says the inspiration for starting a new band that specialized in the playing of nortenoflavored punk music came out of thin air one day. "It was in the name of trying to do something different." Now he fronts two bands. "The Bronx is loud and aggressive, and it's an abrasive band, and we always want it to be that way. But people kept asking us to strip it down and do, you know, a crappy acoustic-rock thing. We didn't want to do that, so we tried to find a creative solution." The solution, it turns out. was mariachi. The first round of critics assumed it was a punk sarcasm; it was not. "Being a band from Los Angeles and being surrounded

by Hispanic culture, it seemed an obvious thing to try."

Once they mastered the music, he says, Mariachi El Bronx realized they were onto something. What it was exactly, they weren't sure, says Caughthran by phone from L.A., but they knew it was the beginning of something out of the ordinary. "And two albums later, here we are."

This is not the first time punk and roots have shared the same stage. During the 1980s, Los Lobos brought

pop and traditional acoustic Mexican music to Black Flag and X mosh pits, "That's the kind of thing we get off on," Caughthran says of the Bronx. "The idea that punk's not necessarily limited to a sound." What's the response been like from audiences that have no idea what they're walking into? "I'm not gonna sit here and say everybody fuckin' loves it, you know, but I think what gets people is we approach music from an honest and creative place.



We love doing it, and I think that translates when we play.





According to C-Level's bar manager Jonathan Boyle, who developed the drink, the Summer Solace is both a backward look at the high season of sun and fun and a cool companion on that slow leafy stroll toward winter. He tells me that in developing the drink, the Solace's ingredients were picked as a sort of cooling antidote to the summertime blues.

"I was drinking some aloe juice I bought in an Asian supermarket and thought it was perfect for a drink about summer — we use aloe for sunburns — and then I thought of cucumbers," he says. "So the Rain [vodka], the cucumbers, the aloe — they all suggested a cooling effect in summer...and then the name, Summer Solace, just seemed to come together."

Boyle calls the Summer Solace "late afternoon, three-to-four o'clock, when the sun's just hitting you" kind of drink. Even in October.

"I think the key ingredient is the aloe juice," he says. "I got turned on to aloe juice a number of years ago; it's lightly sweet without being heavy, and with some citrus it brightens up nicely. The whole thing should be balanced and thirst-quenching above everything else.'

Even with San Diego's overdose of sunshine, the shadows grow longer, the days shorter. and it won't be long before Boyle starts running short on the Summer Solace

Kitchen Proof: "Bright" is the right word for the Summer Solace. Light on its feet, it skips with the exotic lightness of the aloe mixing well with the citrus and melon flavors and it finishes off clean with the depth-defying bittersweet of pomegranate.

news of the WeiRD

LEAD STORY

— In McGehee, a town of 4,200 in southeastern Arkansas, a black girl (Kym Wimberly) who had finished first in her senior class was named only "co-"valedictorian after officials at McGehee High changed the rules to avoid what one called a potential "big mess." As a result, in a twist on "affirmative action," the highest-scoring white student was elevated to share top honors. Said Kym's mother, "We [all] know if the tables were turned, there wouldn't be a co-valedictorian." In July, the girl filed a lawsuit against the school and the protocol-changing principal.

Redneck Chronicles

- Ronald Adams, 49, was arrested in June for assaulting an 8-year-old boy in his home in Ouachita Parish, La., after an argument over which TV program to watch. Adams allegedly threw a TV remote, hitting the child in the head, because the kid insisted on "cartoons" while Adams preferred "wrestling."
- Authorities in St. Lucie County, Fla., investigated an incident in May in which a woman allegedly fired an AR-15 rifle at a target inside her bedroom closet and in which the gunshots went through the wall and damaged a washing

machine, springing a water leak throughout the residence. (Officials said the woman's husband fired shots, too, and that it wasn't the first time the couple had engaged in bedroom target practice.)

The Continuing Crisis

— A Southampton (England) University researcher told an academic conference in Stockholm in July that his work, demonstrating that women who stop smoking even after becoming pregnant will have healthier babies, is important because he found that pregnant women rationalize continued smoking, in part to have smaller babies that will be less uncomfortable to deliver.

— The city council of Gould, Ark. (pop. 1100), voted in July to make it illegal for its citizens to form "groups" without written permission from the council. (The mayor and the city council are feuding over the budget, and the council, attempting to stifle lobbying by a group supporting the mayor, has taken down all "groups" — except that the ordinance appears to blatantly violate the First Amendment.)

Chutzpah!

- Even though Michigan schoolteacher Mar-

cie Rousseau was sentenced in December to at least four years in prison for having sex with a high school boy in Saginaw and Midland counties, the episode is not over. Now, the "victim" has filed a lawsuit against Rousseau and school officials for what his lawyer described as "not consensual" sex. The unnamed, then-16-year-old admitted to at least 100 acts of sexual intercourse and 75 "other" sex acts, and asks at least \$1 million for "physical, psychological, and emotional injury."

Government in Action!

— Of the 1500 judges who referee disputes as to whether someone qualifies for Social Security disability benefits, David Daugherty of West Virginia is the current soft-touch champion, finding for the claimant about 99 percent of the time (compared to judges' overall rate of 60 percent). As the Wall Street Journal reported in May, Daugherty decided many of the cases without hearings or with the briefest of questioning, including batches of cases brought by the same lawyer. He criticized his less lenient colleagues, who "act like it's their own damn money we're giving away." (A week after the report, Judge Daugherty was placed on leave, pending an investigation.)

Police Report

— NYPD officer James Seiferheld, 47, still receives his \$52,365 annual disability pay despite relentless efforts of the department to fire him. He had retired in 2004 on disability, but was ordered back to work when investigators found him doing physical work inconsistent with "disability." However, Seiferheld could not return to work because he repeatedly failed drug screening (for cocaine). Meanwhile, his appeal of the disability denial went to the state Court of Appeals, which found a procedural error and ordered that Seiferheld's "disability" benefits continue.

— In April, Robert Williams completed his San Diego police officers' application, answering truthfully, he said, questions 172 (yes, he had had sexual contact with a child) and 175 (yes, he had "viewed or transacted" child pornography). Three weeks later, the police had not only rejected his application but arrested him. Williams's wife, Sunem, said the police department has "integrity" problems because "telling the truth during the hiring process brings prosecution...."
