



#### You can take her anywhere

The violent death of Libyan dictator Muammar Qaddafi has evoked varying recollections of his decades-long absolute rule. Back in March 2004, congressional Democrat Susan Davis traveled to Libya. According to a gift report filed by Davis, who holds the

San Diego County record for congressional junkets, she was "a member of a congressional delegation visiting Libya as a guest of the Libyan Parliament." As gifts from

foreign governments go, it was modest: \$117 in lodging and

\$52 for meals. The seven-member delegation, according to disclosure records, included Republican Thad McCotter of Michigan, Democrat Silvestre Reyes of Texas, and the GOP's Rodney Alexander of Louisiana.

The visit was made after Qaddafi agreed to take apart his country's nuclear program in exchange for U.S. diplomatic recognition. According to newspaper accounts, Republican Curt Weldon told the Libyan General People's Congress, "Your leader is correct. The two peoples of Libya and America have to engage and understand each other."

Qaddafi spoke afterwards, saying, "Libya was very enthusiastic about possessing the nuclear bomb during the Cold War confrontations. It

wasn't Libya only, every country was seeking the nuclear bomb, even the poorest countries.... If we got this bomb, which country would I attack? The United States? I would be crazy, the United States

has thousands of nuclear bombs." He added, "Libya was defending the Palestinian cause and so had tension with the Americans"

#### Cash without cause Robert Nascenzi,

the computer executive who dropped out of the 52nd District primary in the race to take on GOP congressman Brian Bilbray next year, managed to collect a healthy \$77,654 in contributions through September 30, according to his federal campaign filing. Donors included venture capitalist Kevin Kinsella (\$1000); Justice Department attorney Jeffrey Auerhahn (\$750); Tom Compogiannis, chief financial officer of WIS International (\$1000); Jay Cohan of Westech Investment Advisors (\$500); Biocept, Inc., chief executive Stephen M. Coutts and Jane Coutts (\$1000); dentist Doug Disraeli (\$1000); venture capitalist and Padres board vice chairman Glenn Doshay (\$1000); Sequenom vice president of human resources Alisa Judge (\$1000); downtown real estate agent David Marino of Hughes Marino (\$1000); and Geoscape founder

> César Melgoza of Miami, Florida's Latin Force Group (\$2500). Nascenzi said he left the race to make way for fellow Democrat and ex-San Diego city councilman Scott Peters, a centrist who still faces an intraparty challenge from liberal ex-assemblywoman Lori Saldaña. Next year's primary will be the first under the state's

of party, facing each other in the general election.

Presidential bets Early results are in from horsey Rancho Santa Fe regarding the presidential fund-raising derby, and so far the winner is **Mitt Romney**, with \$112,000 from the beginning of the year through September 30. According to data from Congressional Quarterly's MoneyLine website, \$2500 Romney donors included Marilyn Fletcher, wife of retired savings and loan magnate Kim Fletcher; ex-Del Mar fair board member Robin Parsky; and Douglas Kimmelman of Energy Capital Partners. Among the rest of the GOP pack, Minnesota congresswoman Michele Bachmann drew sizable support, with \$25,050. Texas governor **Rick Perry**, a latecomer to the race, got \$13,750. (Ex-downtown redevelopment hon-

cho Fred Maas gave Perry \$2500.) Ron Paul picked up \$8000. Pizza magnate Herman Cain, a grassroots favorite and front-runner in some national polls, managed only \$3500

from the bastion of GOP privilege. Ex-House Speaker Newt Gingrich got \$2700, \$200 from car dealer Bob Baker and the rest from Peri Urvek, listed as a retiree. Utah's Jon Huntsman got a single \$500

contribution, from physician and biotech consultant Douglas Axelrod. Incumbent president Barack Obama took in \$31,905. Regular Democratic donor Elizabeth

Keadle was down for \$5000, but the biggest Obama giver was Karen Kohlberg, whose occupation is listed as philanthropist, with \$10,000. — Matt Potter

# **Please Upgrade** the Tenants

n a hot Friday evening in late August, Jennifer Bernal and Jamila DeCarli sit at the kitchen table in their 998-square-foot

home on the rim of Fox Canyon in City Heights. Their two small dogs rest on the floor nearby, as does the 70-pound husky they're dogsitting. A red-eared slider turtle named Sushi floats in a murky tank near the window.

Bernal, the more streetwise of the two, admonishes her girlfriend DeCarli for having purchased this house, for which she paid \$345,000 in 2006. Had they known each other then, Bernal says she would have talked DeCarli out of buying on this street.

"To tell the truth, I was just excited that I owned a house. I didn't care where it was," DeCarli admits. "I was excited about living in a diverse neighborhood. I was excited to get out from under the thumb of my snotty ноа in my condosetting in Hillcrest."

When I ask if she'd make the same decision today, DeCarli says, "Move here? Hell, no."

"But do we convince nice

to North Park to Normal Heights, and I'm, like, 'Keep moving this way! Keep moving toward City Heights!""

Most of the houses on Lantana Drive are set close to the road, their yards not much bigger than the sidewalk squares they butt up against. The setting is intimate. Before the neighbors next door moved out, it was not uncommon for Bernal and DeCarli to hear them copulating — exuberantly. Today, in their tiny living room, the women have two fans and a standing air conditioner - all on high settings. "Our coping mecha-

hopeful that the neighborhood is changing for the better — especially since DeCarli is upside-down on her mortgage and has decided to stick it out.

"I've been living in San Diego since 1998," Bernal says. "I've seen this transition moving east on University Avenue, from Hillcrest

nism," DeCarli explains. "To drown out the noise [of the neighbors]."

The loud copulating couple no longer lives next door, but neither were they the worst of what DeCarli, Bernal, and other neighbors have endured. Nearby, at 4790 and 4802 Lantana Drive, stand two apart-

ment buildings, four and six units, respectively. Both were bought six years ago by JB Trust, the living trust of an elderly couple. The buildings were declared a "public nuisance property" by the Fox Canyon Neighborhood Association, which filed a suit in small claims court against the trust last January. The suit was one of many steps the association took toward addressing the issues the properties posed to the neighborhood. In July 2010, after three years of collecting evidence, documenting "nuisance effects," and attempting to negotiate with the buildings' owners, association president Jose Lopez sent the owners a demand letter.

The letter rebuked the property owners for "poor or non-existent property management skills" as evidenced by "blight and dilapidation" and "nuisance tenants."

"Loud and profanity-ridden angry expressions and commands given to adults and children directly or at a distance from the balconies are the norm in your property...," the letter read.




Jamila DeCarli (left) bought her Fox Canyon house to escape a "snotty HOA" in Hillcrest. Now she's dealing with crime and noise.

According to Lopez, who has lived in the neighborhood since 1993 and who founded the association in 1997, the properties' previous owners kept the apartments in good shape before they sold them in 2005.

"Within three months after the new owners took possession," Lopez says, "the good tenants that were still there moved out. Because what moved into the rest of the units was just yucky."

Much of what Lopez knows about issues with the properties is secondhand. His house is located toward the quieter end of the street. But for four years, DeCarli and Bernal, like other neighbors closer to the buildings, have experienced the problems firsthand.

"You have things that happen, like a girlfriend stabbed her boyfriend in the gut and then ran down the street."

That was about eight months ago. "A week and a half ago,

somebody tried to throw his girlfriend out the window," DeCarli tells me in late August.

Then, there's the litter, the children in the street, and the time a child's fifth birthday party ended with "adults fighting, throwing bottles at each other" and people getting arrested, she adds.

According to the San Diego Police Department, officers have been dispatched to the two buildings a total of 134 times over the past two years — 42 times to 4790 Lantana and 92 times to 4802 Lantana. The ten units in the two buildings account for approximately 10 percent of the residences on Lantana Drive and 47 percent of the police visits.

Lopez says his purpose in documenting the problems and sending the letter was to get the owners to manage the buildings properly. When the demand letter yielded no response, Lopez filed the lawsuit.

Jake May, a real estate agent, is a friend of the elderly couple. He tells me that the wife died in June and the husband is in poor continued on page 44

### Occupy Outpouring

Protesters, Labor, **Critical Mass Converge** 

*Downtown* — Police raids on the Occupy San Diego protest early Friday morning drew a groundswell of support for the group, which last night hosted what was likely the largest crowd since the movement's early days at Civic

#### Center Plaza downtown.

Long-term occupiers were joined by labor groups who passed out pizza and water. Approximately 500 demonstrators had gathered in the plaza by 8 p.m. Friday night. Their numbers briefly doubled when, shortly after 8:30, riders in Critical Mass, a monthly cycling event, stopped by to show support for the group.

A few protesters circled the plaza, soliciting donations for bail money to release the last few of the reported 51 that were arrested on various charges after police and sheriff's deputies dismantled the

encampment that had slowly begun to re-emerge after being shut down two weeks ago.

**Tensions briefly** escalated when one of the waterfilled barricades police had erected to limit access to the plaza from Third Avenue was overturned, sending water and protesters pouring into the street.

Several of the two dozen or so officers holding a line across the street rushed to their patrol vehicles and returned with riot shields.

Ultimately, there was no major confrontation, though two more protesters were arrested, bringing the day's total to 53. One was charged with battery for attempting to strike an officer, another was charged with

> assault with a deadly weapon for throwing a can that hit an officer in the face.

> Shortly after 10:00 p.m. and upon the return of the march, 300 or more protesters continued to occupy the plaza. Police, vowing

to firmly enforce rules against sleeping, threatened to arrest anyone who sat down. Enforcement on this rule was later lifted. Most sleeping was condoned, if not explicitly, by officers present. By dawn, the group appeared to have thinned to less than a hundred protesters, and police ordered the group roused.

means Kappabashi Street, but there are other streets that start with the word Kappa," I said. "Do you know what that means?" David shook his head.








# **"Hotel Halcon" Haunted House Harvests Horrified Howls**

Local Entrepreneur Defends Gruesome Displays Mimicking Mexican Cartel Massacres: "Hey, isn't it time somebody made some legitimate money off of this whole scene?"

Critics unable to do much more than cover their mouths and grip their stomachs

UNABLE TO AVERT MY GAZE FROM A DISEMBOD-IED HEAD THAT I AM NOT ENTIRELY CERTAIN IS A FAKE - Unless you are somehow involved in the Mexican drug wars, the odds are that you will not wind up decapitated, dismembered, castrated, hung from a bridge, stuffed into a van already crammed with other dead bodies, or dissolved in acid. And unless you travel to a cartel hotspot such as Ciudad Juárez, the odds are pretty good that you won't see anybody who has suffered those fates, either. Unless, of course, you pay a visit to Chula Vista's Hotel Halcon (the term refers to a cartel informant), a Halloween haunted house that seeks to ratchet up the scream factor by skipping out on the ghosts and goblins and instead re-creates actual scenes from the nightmarish world of torture and execution that the drug war spawned.

"I wanted to do something different," explained Joe Serra, who got the idea for the hotel after discovering a trove of bro-

ken and discarded mannequins behind the Mission Valley Center Charlotte Russe clothing store. "I mean, everybody has seen the horror movie stuff, you know? There's not a lot of potential for shock anymore. Oooh, the torture room from Hostel! Eek! The facesplitter from Saw! But a murdered four-year-old girl in a glasstopped coffin? A dealer's totally hot girlfriend, minus her arms and legs and hair? Sixteen bodies laid side-by-side in a dump, all with mutilated genitals, all either decapitated or suffocated with masks made from packing tape? Now you're talking scary, because that shit is real."

But as with the *narco-corridos* — Mexican pop songs that adopt the voice and manner of the cartels in their lyrics — some are questioning whether a haunted house that glorifies violence associated with the Mexican drug war can stoke that same violence.

Serra says he's just giving the people what they want. "It's a market, and I'm in the scare industry," he says matter-offactly. "If I don't do it, someone else is doing it." Serra says the *encintados* display — the term refers to those who are found bound in packing tape — represents power. "It's just an image saying how someone, you know, [who] is dumb enough to mess with the wrong guys can become wrapped in packing tape until he suffocates and stuff."

At the same time, Serra says the violence across the border pains him. "I was born in the United States, but I'm also Mexican, and it hurts me to see people's faces carved off and sewn onto soccer balls," Serra said. "I just think that...it's just a haunted house. You give people what they need to be scared right now."

# To Tank Or Not To Tank



With once-in-a-generation quarterback Andrew Luck on the line, 0-16 looks like a pretty good season.

n the phone with a friend I'll call Henry Hill. He's a family man, casino consultant, degenerate gambler, and believer in conspiracy theories. Henry thinks the Indianapolis Colts are tanking the season.

Conspiracy theories are fun to play with. Some, like the President Kennedy assassination conspiracy, I regard as true, but most don't make the cut, particularly those that depend on many people acting skillfully at the same time.

As to Henry and the Indianapolis Colts. If the team goes 0-16 and the head coach is not fired, and then, armed with the number-one draft pick, the Colts select Stanford's once-in-a-generation quarterback Andrew Luck (everybody's candidate to be the next Peyton Manning), then I'll have to revisit Henry's theory.

At 0-8, the Colts are halfway there. Peyton Manning is almost certainly out for the season. On September 8, Manning had a single-level anterior (read: *neck*) fusion procedure (read: *operation*). That was his third neck surgery. So, we can count him gone. But, it's hard to believe the loss of one man, even a four-time NFL MVP, causes a team that has made it to the playoffs every year for the past nine years in a row, a team that has been to the Super Bowl twice in the past five years...hard to believe the loss of that one man means that same team goes 0-8, including a 62-to-7 loss to New Orleans, a defeat so deep and thorough that it wasn't a defeat as much as a surrender.

Yes, other Indy players are out for the sea-

son (strong safety Melvin Bullitt and middle

linebacker Gary Brackett), but that happens

to every team. It's true the team was designed

around Manning's individual talents, but that

doesn't explain it, either. Remember the 2008

New England Patriots? Quarterback Tom Brady

was injured in the first quarter of the first game and was out for the season. The Pats went 11-5 that year.

Good coaches coach the team they have. If you don't have Manning, then you draw up an offensive scheme that plays to the strength of the quarterback you have on the field. The Colts' backup quarterback had been Curtis Painter, three years in residence. In a heart-tugging vote of confidence, club president Bill Polian and general manager Chris Polian (aka the Polian Bros.) went out and spent \$4 million on quarterback Kerry Collins. Collins had played 16 years in the NFL and recently retired.

Collins didn't know the Colts' playbook, didn't know where the cafeteria was, but did know enough to insist on a guaranteed contract. He started three games before exiting in the fourth quarter of game three with "concussionlike symptoms." He's on injured reserve now and can go home. During his stay, he completed 49 percent of his throws.

Now then, the Colts could turn to their secret backup quarterback, punter Pat McAfee, or to their just jilted backup quarterback, Curtis Painter, who does know the playbook, players, coaches, and where the cafeteria is.

Painter was the unanimous choice!

And to insure a successful season, the Colts signed another quarterback, Dan Orlovsky. Orlovsky has been a second- or third-string quarterback for Detroit and Houston, cut by Houston before training camp, invited to the Colts' 2011 camp as a free agent, and subsequently cut.

The Colts sail into the second half of the season with Curtis Painter at the helm and Dan Orlovsky as his first mate. Are Painter and Orlovsky the two best QBs available? Not even close. The Colts could have made a run at Carson Palmer or David Garrard, even Brett Favre. Favre will win you some games, even now. Instead, they relentlessly (one could say *intentionally*) went for mediocrity.

Here's the beauty part of Henry's conspiracy theory: Players see the front office hire inept quarterbacks when better quarterbacks are available. Players know their team runs the same defensive and offensive schemes as they did when Manning was playing. Players see teammates who aren't playing hard. Nobody has to meet you in an alley and whisper, "Psst. Throw the game or your family gets it," for you to slack off.

This scenario doesn't even require cooperation from the coaching staff. The GM provides the players. Just make sure you only have mediocre quarterbacks on the roster and let nature take its course. You'll still need some luck to go 0-16, but so will Miami. Miami pulled out a loss against the Giants on Sunday, but it took a ten-point fourth quarter from New York to get it done.

Follows was written Friday by Bob Kravitz, a sports columnist for the *Indianapolis Star*: "If it comes down to the final two weeks and Luck is on the line, tank. Seriously, tank."

#### Game of the Week: #9 La Costa Canyon at #4 Oceanside

OCEANSIDE — A slow start may have kept La Costa Canyon in obscurity early in the season, but the Mavericks can't hide any longer. Friday night, October 28, at Oceanside, ninth-ranked La Costa Canyon climbed out of an early hole and outplayed the fourth-ranked Pirates in the second half to deliver a 21-16 upset.

#### "I was walking through the park/ goosing statues in the dark/ If Sherman's horse can take it so can you."

The children in my neighborhood are a life-affirmative kind of pleasure for me, despite their girlish screaming and boyish growling sounds. They are noisy urchins, to be sure, yet somehow I find their racket reassuring. Mostly they are African-American or Mexican-American and, for the most part, under 12 years old. Their noise is far preferable to me than the uglier sounds of their

parents: fighting, cursing, jabbering until dawn on — I figure — crack or methamphetamine, the revving of cars endlessly and seemingly to little point other than to announce to neighbors that they have six cylinders and maybe a 409 cubic under the hood. Ghetto status.

One particular charm the little poets possess is their chanting while jumping rope, often several of them at a time. I can barely catch

all of it, but one I did is recited, "Who stole the jewelry from the jewelry store? Number one!" Another, usually next to the first breathy rope-jumper, will say, "Who me?"

First chanter: "Yeah you." Second: "Couldn't be." First: "Then who?" Second: "Number two!" Third rope-skipper: "Who me?" Second: "Yeah you." Third: "Couldn't be." Second: "Then who?"

Third: "Number four..." Etcetera, until the chorus returns after all of the rope-jumpers have recited their parts. Apparently there is some sort of penalty for flubbing the script in any way.

Another of these is one I heard as a kid as well, though I don't remember where or when. This one is simpler but easier to mis-recite than the more complicated patter above. It is chanted to the beat of rope and feet on pavement. "I was walking through the park/ goosing statues in the dark/ If Sherman's horse can take it so can you." If any of the players — and this seems the most common mistake — substitute the words "park" and "dark," some dire penalty will ensue, though I have no idea what that might be.

I've mentioned before that I tend to like children, though by this I absolutely do not intend to imply that I am enamored with all of them. I have known more than a few insufferable and spoiled brats. One that springs to mind is a little pecker named Bran. He would play with my son in a bamboo stand down the canyon in our backyard in Hillcrest/Mission Hills (right on the artificial real-estate border on Curlew Street) and had a fondness for lobbing rocks at passing cars and once or twice my son. He would also break off lengths of bamboo and either whack my son and/or his friends with the thing or stab someone (again, more than once, my son) doing no serious damage but necessitating some rudimentary first aid and causing my usually stoic son to wipe at tears from his usually dry ducts.

I wrote a longish short story featuring Bran and called it — imaginatively enough — "The Bamboo." One short-fiction publisher responded to my submission with a note stating something to the effect that it was an interesting enough idea, "A kind of cross

between Peter Pan and The Lord of the Flies, but not enough Pan and too many flies. Perhaps if the story were more upbeat, less depressing, and featured more sympathetic characters than the two you've introduced and then do almost nothing with them (they serve only as victims), the piece could be salvaged. As it is, there is nothing here for readers who might want something more than a kind of Heart of Darkness involving children."

I sent it to a few more publishers and received similar comments. It is still in one of my trunks full of rejections.

Now, apropos of none of this, it occurs to me that a recent column of mine, written pretty much in longhand with vitriol instead of ink, concerned several of my pet peeves. I forgot one major one and consider this (shifting gears as thoroughly as one might imagine) an opportunity to complain of yet another and what I consider more major beef. That is the attitude that many people have toward someone reading a book or even a magazine or newspaper. Often, on the bus or on a park bench or even in my own home when guests are present, reading anything will be interpreted as "doing nothing." As long as one is "doing nothing," he may be interrupted with impunity.

Too many times I have been reading something very involving, but since I'm being idle, this is a cue for others to initiate a conversation, a monologue, or diatribe with much to do with the speaker's vastly uninteresting life story.

This same thing will happen while one is playing an instrument, I've noticed. But more about that another time...maybe.



**T**ime keeps on slippin', slippin', slippin', into the future," I serenaded hubby Patrick with the Steve Miller song as I hustled through chores last Saturday.

"Oil keeps on burnin', burnin', burnin', out of my Chevy," he replied. "Another week passed, still no oil change, and no time to do it."

"Candice down the street has a mobile oil-change guy come out to her house," I said. "I'm sure she does," Patrick

chuckled. (Bleach-blonde 50-something Candice is sort of the neighborhood merry widow.) I made a couple of calls.

"We'll travel just about anywhere in the city, if the job is right," explained Joe Seals, owner of So-Cal Oil Star (619-717-2913;

oilstaronline.com). "We'll go to

homes in the downtown San Diego area, 92101 zip code, and we'll travel 20 to 25 miles from downtown, which covers the vast majority of the county. Beyond that 20- to 25-mile radius, we need to do three cars per visit to make it cost-effective. If there's a company with a fleet of vehicles, then we'll travel up to San Marcos or Oceanside, depending on how many vehicles. And we work on any type of vehicle - RVs, trucks, diesels."

Turnaround time on oil changes depends on demand, but it's within a week.

"We change the oil and top off fluids on the vehicle: the windshield-wiper fluid, the radiator fluid, the brake fluid, any fluids that can easily be accessed to fill up. We also fill up the tires if they need to be. And check the windshield wipers and let people know if they need to change them. Headlight restoration — it's about a ten-point inspection, checking little things here and there."

SoCal Oil doesn't use conventional motor oil. "We stick with semi-synthetic and full synthetic. It's better for the vehicle. It covers the parts and it sticks to the parts better inside the engine - helping them last longer, less friction. With semi-synthetic oil, we recommend changing the oil every 4000 miles or four months. With full synthetic oil, it's 5000 miles or five months. We usually use Kendall. We get it from National Petroleum here in San Diego.

"A semi-synthetic oil change runs \$33.95, and that covers up to five quarts and includes

the filter. For the full synthetic, that's \$55.95 for up to five quarts and a filter. There's a \$2.50 waste charge and a tax fee."

Seals says the oil change is a clean operation - no drips or stains left. "We have a system where we hook a hose up to the bottom of the drain pan, and it sucks the oil out. So rather than taking the plug off and having oil shoot out, our drain plug replaces the manufacturer's drain plug and it allows us to hook a hose up to it and suck the oil out. It's a quicker job, a cleaner job, and there are no spills. Depending on the vehicle, the oil change can take from 20 to 30 minutes."

"We work mostly in the North County coastal area, but it depends on the job," said Jay, owner of Coast Mobile Oil Service (760-652-9373; coastmobileoilservice.com). "If it's a fleet of cabs, we will go farther. We work on cars to motor homes, but I don't work on semi tractors."

Coast Mobile's turnaround time depends on the schedule. "If I have the opening, sometimes I can do it that day, but usu-

ally it's the next day. For five quarts of regular oil and an

> oil filter, it costs \$35. For a synthetic oil change, you pay per quart, so it's \$9.91 per quart." With the oil change comes a fluids check.

Coast Mobile will also repair flat tires, if a tire can be patched. "If they get a nail or a screw in the tire, we can patch it. We also do mobile brakes. The cost for brakes is labor plus parts. Parts vary, but labor for replacing a brake pad is \$75 — rear drum brakes, then it's \$95 labor."

Where the oil change can be performed "depends on the regulations in the area," Jay explained. "Some clients will let me know that I can't do it there, so we'll agree on a place. But most of the fleet businesses or the office buildings have a place where cars can be washed or serviced. But I am spillproof; there's nothing to be dripped on the concrete."

# He cleans up on foreclosures

From Yahoo News, December 2010: A suit was filed in March by Pennsylvania homeowner Angela Lannelli. She was up to date on her payments when, she says, she arrived home in October 2009 to find that Bank of America had ransacked her belongings, cut off her utilities, poured antifreeze down her drains, padlocked her doors, and confiscated Luke, her pet parrot of ten years. It took her six weeks to get the bank to clean up the house. The collapse of the housing bubble in 2007, and the wave of foreclosures that followed, created a cottage industry known as "property preservation." The banks, illprepared to manage a sudden inventory of thousands of vacant houses and condominiums, soon mobilized a small army of guys driving around in pick-up trucks with a digital

camera sitting on the front seat and a lawn mower and a leaf blower in the back. At the bottom rung of a lucrative industry that sprang up overnight, these workers earned around \$20 for each "grass cut," for which a middleman would bill a regional vendor, who would then add more to the bill and invoice the bank for the jobs.

It was a pretty sweet deal

all around, even for the guys at the bottom. In Southern California, where I worked, the grass at most properties was usually quite dead, with only a few tufts of green along

the sidewalk where runoff had managed to keep it alive. Many people whose houses are repossessed give up on

watering the grass — or, for that matter, paying the water bill — long before the sheriff shows up with an eviction notice. In the business's heyday, there might be as many as 15 vacant houses within a fivemile radius. Working off a route sheet created with Microsoft Streets & Trips, the game plan was to drive the shortest distance between properties, jump out and take "before" pictures, run the weed wacker. blow the sidewalks, then take "after" pictures and jump back in the truck to hustle on to the next house. In the evening, the photos were sent to the bank via email.

In California foreclosure process, when a person falls behind on a mortgage payment, they are subjected to a "non-judicial" legal process, the ultimate intent being to evict them from the house so that the bank can sell it to a new owner.

It starts with a notice of default, then escalates to a notice of trustee's sale, where the property and its accompanying debt is offered up on the courthouse steps. If no one steps forward to buy the note, the property becomes "bank owned." Sometimes, the bank offers "cash for keys" to the former owner,

a bribe to get them to walk away peacefully and turn over the property in clean condition. Sometimes, it takes an eviction notice, a couple of sheriffs, and a locksmith. Sometimes, people just pack up and walk away on their own; other times, they trash the place before they move out, stripping it of all appliances, light fixtures, light bulbs, and, occasionally, the toilets. One way or another, they all have to go, leaving these properties vacant and in various states of disrepair.

That's when the "trash-out" guys come in. As soon as the prop-

behind — everything, down to the door mats and the potted plants and the Tupperware lids in the back corner of the kitchen cabinets. This process is euphemistically known as "initial services." After initial services are completed, the grass needs to be cut twice a month. I started out in the propertypreservation business doing grass cuts. Eventually, I ended up doing trash-outs, as well. At the time, I was hauling as a second career. I had dropped out of the high-pay,

high-stress white-collar workforce, and was hauling off trash for people clearing out the garage or for move-outs or backyard clean-ups, that sort of thing. One day, I picked up a lastminute job for a bankowned duplex in Lakeside. I worked for a guy who was a middleman: he worked for another guy who had a contract with a major bank to take care of vacant bank-owned properties throughout San Diego County. A deadline had been missed, and a pile of dead wood and palm fronds needed

to be removed from the duplex's backyard, ASAP, so that it could close escrow. He hired me to take care of it.

When the job was completed, we met at a Denny's in El Cajon, and he cut me a check for \$400. A week later he called with a proposition. The main contractor had tasked him with all their grass cuts in San Diego County. At the time, the bank we were working for had about 400 vacant properties, from Oceanside to the border, and out east to Jacumba. I was invited to meet to go over the scope of the work and join up with a team assembled to carry out this monumental task. I drove to where the guy lived and met with him and a blonde surfer dude also hoping to make some fast money.

In addition to the biweekly grass cuts, the properties needed a

monthly "maid refresh." Each service paid a flat \$20: \$20 for the grass workforce in San Diego, which is how guys like me, with no experience,

cut, \$20 for the maid refresh. We would be self-employed subcontractors, with no benefits, no overtime, no workers' compensation. The bank didn't even know who was doing the work. All that was required was that we be legal citizens, have the wherewithal to upload digital images through a high-speed internet connection, and a willingness to work for a couple of months before getting paid. That, of course, eliminated the majority of the indigenous landscaping

aside from occasionally mowing our own lawns, got into the business of mowing lawns for the banks.


The goal was to complete ten jobs a day, ten days in a row. It sounded too good to be true: driving around, weed wacking and picking up old newspapers and tidying up vacant houses, garnering around \$400 per day yeah, you read that right. The only catch was that we wouldn't be paid until the pictures and invoices were sent to the bank and they'd paid the main contractor and he'd paid the guy I was working for. But, the guy said, "I guarantee you will get paid." Here, I thought, was an opportunity to get out of the lousy cash junkhauling gig I'd been scraping by on for the last couple of years. I joined the team.

Twice each month, the cheerful, friendly woman in charge of doling out jobs would send out an email proclaiming "The Grass Cuts Are Here!!" Each guy on the crew received a list of 60–80 properties, mapped out with driving directions to ensure the shortest route between jobs. They tried to give us properties close to where we lived, but there were always a few places out in the boondocks, in Campo,





or Valley Center; those were the least desirable destinations.

I went to Sears and spent several hundred dollars for a gaspowered weed wacker (more properly called a string trimmer) and a leaf blower. I got a long-handled toilet scrubber from Home Depot. I changed the oil in the truck, and set to work. When the list came in, it signified the start of an eight-to-tenday ordeal, working 12 hours at a time without a break, striving to make the deadline. You got a week off before the next batch came in.

I tried to get them



to cut my workload — I was a 45-year-old guy with a torn-up left knee and a drinking problem — but as the months progressed, people kept quitting, and the workload stayed at no fewer than 60 jobs per cycle, sometimes as many as 100. You might get lucky and pick up a bunch of properties in the same neighborhood and spend your day driving from one to the next, not even enough time to smoke a cigarette before it was time to jump out of the truck, take pictures, run the weed wacker, blow the sidewalks, dump some Lysol toilet-bowl

cleaner in the toilets and scrub them until they shined — \$40, ka*ching* — then move on to the next. On the easy ones, it took about 30 minutes. But for every easy job, there were properties that were long distances apart, or places with a thick growth of weeds that needed to be hacked down and raked up and hauled off, or dirty toilets and 2000 square feet of wall-to-wall carpeting that needed to be vacuumed. That's where it got exhausting.

Then it started to rain. The formerly easy grass cuts turned into swaths of six-inch-tall crabgrass and cockleburs. I got behind, sometimes able to complete only eight jobs a day, sometimes having to drive to Alpine or Escondido, 40 miles from my starting point. I purchased a new lawn mower. At first, I got along pretty well with my middleman boss, but after awhile he was constantly on my back. He was a manic, workaholic type. All he cared about was meeting the deadlines, getting the dough. He fired off dis-



Completing ten grass cuts and ten maidrefresh jobs in one day was a lot of work. But I sucked it up. I told myself, \$400 a day, *buddy*. There were ways to speed up the process. If the trash-out guys had done their job, and the house was spotless, you could just take the interior pictures and send them in without doing any cleaning whatsoever. of wear and tear on my truck and a disintegrating relationship with my girlfriend. When the first check finally came in, it was a nice chunk of change. It was also \$500 short. The bank was overwhelmed, I was told. They'd missed a few payments, but the money was coming. And so it went, month after month, the checks short, a few stragglers coming in for work done months previously, but never all of it. As far as the work

went, eventually I toughened up to the point I could run that weed wacker all day long, day after day; it almost became an extension of my arm. I weed wacked in Alpine in a heat wave, 105 degrees. The noise from the twostroke was a distant buzz, muffled by the shimmering heat, and I was sweating, buckets of sweat, ten hours at a stretch. In that kind of weather, you take slower steps and more frequent pauses. Time slows down, until you are encapsulated in the heat, the weed wacker's

buzz like locusts whirring unseen. You drink a gallon of water a day, the money was never going to materialize. It was lost in the shuffle,

# I was sweating, buckets of sweat, ten hours at a stretch.

kept in a cooler of ice, then sweat it back out; the cold water reduces your core temperature, so you can carry on. I got to where I could reduce a yard full of weeds to a crop of stubble and mulch in no time flat. The tricky part was not destroying ornamental plants in the process or sending a rock through a window.

But the late payments, that sucked, waiting for the mail to arrive, finding the box empty, day after day. When a check finally came in, two months after you'd done the work, it was short.





valuable items behind, and, legally, they had 18 days to come back and retrieve their belongings.

When a bank owns a property that has been foreclosed, they assign it to an REO (real estate owned) realtor who will get the listing when it goes up for sale. If the agent discovers the property vacant and abandoned, the bank is notified, and they have someone change the locks and haul off the trash. However, if it appears that the value of what's left behind is more than \$300, a notice is posted on the front door stating that the owners have 18 days to make an appointment with the agent and retrieve their belongings.

Sometimes, they'd send us to mow the grass and complete a maid refresh at properties that were still in this "post and hold" period, and we would find a house full of someone's stuff. Jewelry, art, booze, 54 Chevy trucks in the barn. I never understood why, after they'd evicted the occupants and changed the locks, they couldn't realize that initial services had probably not been completed. Maybe in the general chaos and confusion, they shotgunned out the list of every bank-owned property and left it to us to sort things out. At my level, it was like being a mushroom, kept in the dark.

We took pictures and sent them in by the thousands. I imagined some bank wonk in a cubicle in Texas, trying to keep track of several hundred thousand photos of lawns and toilets, determining which needed grass cuts and which needed trash-outs. Usually the house to clean it, and the master key did not work. The locks

it was obvious, to us, whether the property had been abandoned, people leaving behind only things they weren't able to stuff into a U-Haul — old patio furniture, worn-out shoes, and crusty barbeques. But the banks had a policy that, if a bed was present, it was an indicator that someone might still be living there. They'd put the property straight into the 18-day post-andhold. Even a photo of a ratty, stained mattress on the floor meant that the stuff was off limits for 18 days. Three weeks later, we'd sometimes arrive to find the power off, a refrigerator full of rotting food, and a house full of rodents. Banks.

One day, I rolled up on a property out in Eastlake. There was a large dirt lot with a lot of weeds out in front. It looked vacant, abandoned. I got started on the grass cut, running my beat-up Craftsman weed wacker at full throttle over almost a third of an acre of dead weeds, little decomposed granite pebbles and nettles flying off and stinging my face. I was sweating profusely, another dirty job, one of about ten that day. Then I went to go inside

hadn't been changed yet, so I called the guy I was working for and asked what to do. He said, "You are not getting paid for that one, should have checked the locks before you cut the grass. Hey, dude, you're just an independent contractor. Sorry, sugarbritches." He was laughing, almost giddy, like this was some kind of hilarious joke on me. I did not find it amusing at all.

Another time, I went inside a house that had had the locks changed but not yet been trashed out. It was full of someone's personal belongings. The place was in east Chula Vista, south of Eastlake, in one of the new subdivisions. There were a ton of foreclosures out there. Some of the streets were not even on the Thomas Bros. map yet, and the people were getting locked out of their homes. This particular property was a row home, with a small front yard maintained by the homeowners' association. We only had to wack the little postage stamp of a backyard and do the maid refresh, easy money. I opened the door and stepped into the house without knocking, and stopped in my tracks,

shocked to see that the place was full of stuff. Not the usual junk and trash; it looked like someone still lived there, with art on the walls, furniture, dishes in the sink. It felt like I'd walked into someone's house uninvited. I thought they'd appear at any moment, saying, "What in the hell are you doing here?"

Over the year and a half I was doing grass cuts, I went through three weed wackers, four lawn mowers, two leaf blowers, and three digital cameras. The work was rough on lawn mowers, especially, because half the time you couldn't see what you were mowing underneath the weeds. I killed a nice Sears 6.5 horsepower rear bagger on a rock in Fletcher Hills. I ran a White's side bagger, my favorite lawn mower of all time, flat-out into the ground. I replaced the bent blades on it twice; finally, it gave up the ghost at a property east of El Cajon. I felt like having a funeral for it. In that time, I completed about 800 grass cuts, took around 6000 pictures of grass, before and after, and photos of perhaps 1600 clean and shiny toilets.

At the row home in Chula Vista, after I got over the initial shock of feeling like I'd walked into someone's house uninvited and was critiquing their taste in art and furniture, I took pictures of the debris and sent them in so I could at least get a trip charge out of it. A couple of weeks later, there was a go-ahead on the trash-out and the job was given to the middleman I worked for. He did some of the trash-

outs himself, to make more money while we were out mowing lawns. But he'd missed yet another deadline and needed to get it done, like, yesterday. So he called me and asked if I wanted to start doing trash-outs instead of grass cuts. I immediately agreed. The grass cuts were getting boring, and I'd always liked

the trash business. As it turned out, the townhome in Chula Vista didn't have anything especially valuable in it. The former owner had just packed up and left,

taking what he wanted and leaving the crap he didn't: an extensive VHS video collection, some Ikea furniture, magazines, art prints, dishes. It was the

detritus of yet another person who'd walked away. Soon the condo was empty, cleaned to a sparkling shine and freshly vacuumed, without a trace of the former

Sometimes, people would yank out the refrigerator, leaving the line to the ice-maker dripping. It ruined the floor. Sometimes, you found pictures of children, pets, or homemade birthday cards, everything left behind in the chaos. It was a little sad, depressing even, one vacant house after another, silent, empty, bobby pins in the carpets jamming up the vacuum cleaner, a favorite toy left next to a sleeping bag and a pillow on the floor. It felt like cleaning up the aftermath of broken dreams. But you get used to it. People often left the booze, half-empty bottles of tequila, wine on the top shelf, various liquors, cans of beer left over from the last party, before they moved out for good. I made a rule for myself: if the seal on a bottle was open, I poured it down the sink. A gurgling fifth of Jack Daniel's always gave it a fresh, clean smell, like a dentist's office. One day, I found several bottles of French Champagne, \$200-a-bottle stuff. I meant to save them for a special occasion but ended up drinking them, one by one, usually after I'd run out of beer. The decadent luxury of knocking back an expensive bottle of Champagne on top of a Miller High Life beerbuzz was one of the little perks of the job.

After a year and a half, it all fell apart. I was still owed a couple thousand dollars for grass cuts that had been done months earlier, and by then I was fully occupied hauling

tons of trash out of vacant houses. It was a whole new ball game,

dice. Typical to form, the guy didn't have his checkbook with him,

but the same old story on payments. Always late, always short. It finally got to the point where I couldn't take it anymore.

I suppose we could have worked through it and built the business up altogether as a team, but by that point, I wasn't interested in cooperation and teamwork; I just wanted the money for the work I had done. So I quit. For a few months, I waited for the payments to catch up, then I filed a small-claims action against the middleman for the rest of what I felt was owed me. As near as I could figure, it was about \$2500.

I won in small claims, but the case was appealed to superior court. The appeals judge didn't seem too impressed with either of us. He blandly suggested we step outside into the hallway and try and settle the matter during a recess in the hearing. I had the feeling I was going to walk away with nothing if the matter was decided by the court, so we settled with a handshake for \$500, and the case was dismissed without preju-

but after three weeks of unanswered phone calls and haranguing emails, he finally mailed me the money. And that was the end of it.

I still do a little preservation work now and then, not so much of the high-volume, fastmoney stuff anymore, just a few freelance jobs here and there. I have people who work for me, and I do okay. I get to be my own boss.

I sit in front of the computer, uploading pictures, a cold beer on the desk. It's addictive, working in the sun, and being out on the road, taking pictures, before and after, of the many tasks completed, and then viewing the results of the day's work on a Microsoft slideshow. Day after day, ratty jungles are transformed into manicured lawns, so much trash is hauled off, and so many hidden treasures are found. We're vultures swooping in on a dead carcass, salvaging the detritus of the unfortunate, making ugly things disappear, and making dirty places clean. I always pay the people that work for me, every dime, whether I get paid or not.

Onboard the flagship San Diego, Sebastían Vizcaíno hadn't seen the Santo Tomás in 41 days. Before his expedition left Acapulco to chart the California coast in 1602, the old Santo

still questioned its seaworthiness. The top-heavy Peruvian galleon could barely maneuver. Vizcaíno feared that the ship, which disappeared off Magdalena Bay, had been lost at sea.


On September 1, writes Vizcaíno's diarist, "God deigned" that the ships would reunite at Cedros Island. Amid

his jubilation, the diarist noted for the first time that "the men were becoming worn out and ill."

In an age that measured time by sundials and hourglasses, people thought in blocks of weeks and months. Onboard ship, off a sterile coastline, the expedition had a daily need for fresh food and water. By the time they reached Cedros, their diet of fish, biscuits, and brackish "green" water — but no perishable vegetables and no Vitamin C — began to take its toll.

Sailors became lethargic. Reddishblue bruises began appearing on the skin, first single dots, then expanding into clusters. Veteran seamen recognized the early symptoms of scurvy.

Adding to the burden, soldiers used



quarter pipes to pump drinking water from underground wells. At Cedros, the brittle pipes, made from wormeaten staves, began to decay. "When we thought we had water," writes Vizcaíno's diarist, "we were without it."


On September 9, the fleet sailed north-northwest. The *San Diego*, the *Santo Tomás*, and the *Tres Reyes* must keep together, Vizcaíno ordered: if

a storm came up, they should return to the sheltered bay at Cedros. Given favoring southwest winds, they would continue north to Cenzias Island and wait 12 days.

On September 18, a northwest gale blew so hard, writes Father Ascensión, "the waves reached the heavens with an abyss between them." Incessant currents of air had pounded the expedition all the way up the coast. But nothing compared to these invisible battering rams bent on demolishing the fleet. The sea roared like a waterfall blown sideways.

On the *San Diego*, Vizcaíno refused to give ground. "Furl the sails and lay to," he shouted. The ship plowed into the waves and frantic gusts of air. Not stout enough to forge straight ahead, the *Santo Tomás* unfurled the lower fore- and spirit-sails and scudded out to sea.

The monster gale blew 24 hours. When it died at nightfall, as abruptly as it arose, an iron-gray fog cloaked the growing darkness. The murky mist became palpable, more like smoke than moisture. Captains couldn't see the other ships' signal lanterns. Then they couldn't see their own crews.

The fleet rejoined the next day, only to face a second assault: brutal northwest winds and another dark fog "so thick that a man could not see another in the waist of the ship," writes Ascensión. Broad daylight became dusk. Once again, the *Santo*  *Tomás* had headed west. This time, "to the great sorrow of all," it vanished. Once again Vizcaíno feared the worst: merciless waves would splinter the tired old galleon, and the crew would drown.

When the skies finally cleared, not seeing the other ships, Captain Corbon of the *Santo Tomás* assumed that Vizcaíno had sailed back to Cedros. But when the galleon reached the island's lee side, the fleet was not there. So Corbon sailed west.

Many days later, near a large, unnamed island, winds came up. Rows of waves the size of houses rolled into the *Santo Tomás*. The bow made a sudden crack.

The timbers — the ship's wooden support



frames — shivered. Sailors feared that the trembling, like a quaking ribcage, was a sign that the end was near.

Water seeped through a fissure on the ship's nose. The main timber had begun to splinter. The trickle became a steady stream of brine. Excess water-weight up front tilted the *Santo Tomás* forward. Then it pitched. Ascensión thought it could "open up and founder."

"To the mainland," shouted Captain Corbon. His reasoning: if the ship fractured, the crew might be close enough to swim to shore.

They sailed toward land, writes Ascensión, to "see if perchance Our Lord, Jesus Christ, would grant them the favor of finding" the *San Diego*.

Days later, as they approached today's San Quintín Bay (about 100 miles south of Ensenada), the ships rejoined. They'd been apart 28 days.

"A plain miracle," declared Ascensión. "When one ship was arriving in such need, the other should meet her and console those who had lost all hope of rescue."

Possibly to commemorate the site of the reunion, Vizcaíno's diarist declared the area to have the best climate "in the world, for the night dews last until 10:00 in the forenoon."

Cabrillo had originally called the shallow, placid bay — where cinder cones loom like sentinels — San Quintín. Vizcaíno, as was his wont, renamed it "the Bay of Eleven Thousand Virgins." In 500 A.D., when Ursula, a virtuous Roman maiden, refused to marry the leader of the German Huns, he ordered her killed, along with her 11 ladies in waiting. (Someone added the three zeros later.)

On October 28, seeking shelter from another storm, the fleet anchored in Bahia de San Simon y Judas (today's Colnett Bay, 50 miles south of Ensenada). A mountain on the north shore, sheared down to the beach, provided ample protection from the elements.

In desperate need of water, especially for the Santo Tomás, Vizcaíno sent Captain Peguero and ensign Juan Francisco ashore with 20 armed soldiers. Several accounts say Vizcaíno told them to "treat well the Indians, especially when embarking and disembarking." Given what followed — and since the viceroy had ordered the death penalty for anyone mistreating natives — accounts may have added "treat well" after the fact.

At sunset, the party dug a well in the sand and found fresh water. As they inserted the decaying pipes and began to fill barrels, more than 100 natives drew near with bows and clubs. They were "very insolent," writes Vizcaíno's diarist, "to the extent of drawing their bows and picking up stones to throw at us."

The landing party made signs that they meant no harm. Then the soldiers bowed their heads and went about their business as if the naked warriors didn't exist.

Natives shouted threats at the mute interlopers. Some ran forward, waving bows or clubs, then pulled back. No response. Soldiers loaded barrels and bottles of water onto the launch and returned to the ships.

The next day, Captain Peguero, Ensign Alarcón, and chief pilot Bolaños went ashore with many soldiers. They brought small gifts and biscuits as peace offerings.

Groups of natives assembled near the wells. They waved their arms and made signs: "leave at once!" One ran up, snatched a bottle, and raced back to the group. Others tried to

disrupt the digging.

The soldiers remained as docile as monks. Accounts differ about what happened next. Ascensión says the natives detected weakness in the strangers from the sea. "As the Indians saw that our people treated them well, they concluded that

they did this for fear of them." As a result, the natives "began to commit excesses."

One "counted coup" with his bow. He looped it around a Spaniard's neck and gave the hairy man a good tug.

Antonio Flores, pilot of the Tres Reyes, drew his cutlass and hacked the bowstring. Natives fitted arrows onto their bows and drew them back. Others prepared to throw clubs and stones.

Several soldiers with match-lit arquebuses took aim. But instead of a volley of warning shots, they fired low, into the crowd.

The blasts of powder, the strange puffs of smoke, and the sudden cries and shrieks scattered the natives. At least six hobbled off, wounded by balls of small shot. Two fell on the sand. Others, defiant, came back and carried the bodies up a hill. Writes Ascensión, they showed themselves to be "very much offended."

Two hours later, over 200 natives returned, covered with feathers and painted for war. They approached in squadrons. "With arms in hand," writes Vizcaíno's diarist, "they came toward us, who to them seemed few."

Alarcón's soldiers took positions on the beach and lit arguebus fuses. Then he noticed that women and children had joined the throng. He made a sign of friendship — to see if they'd come to fight. He also signaled his soldiers to hold their fire.

The natives parted in the middle. A boy emerged

carrying a little white puppy. He walked across the no-man's-land between combatants and set the animal down at Alarcón's feet. An offering of peace.

Alarcón met with the native leaders. "Be quiet," he signed. "We should be friends."

The leaders agreed, but no more gunfire.

"Although as friends they joined the Spaniards," writes Ascensión, "they never took their eyes off the arquebuses, explaining by signs that four of them had died and others were badly wounded."

Having gathered water and wood, the fleet departed the next day, October 30.

The three ships hugged the coastline, battling a cold current and wind at the prow. On November 5, they came upon two small islands about 12 miles from a bay. When Cabrillo had passed by 60 years earlier, he'd named the area San Mateo.

Vizcaíno, who swore Cabrillo's geographical markings were askew, renamed it Ensenada de Todos Santos ("bay of all saints"), since he'd arrived there — today's Ensenada — at dawn on All Saints Day.

They planned to enter the bay and sound the depths. But a favoring breeze came up. These were so rare that the fleet had to take advantage. They would perform cartographic chores on the return voyage.

The expedition continued north, into a strong headwind. Large pillars of smoke marked its progress day and night. Ascensión: "These the Indians made as if calling to the ships to come close to their country, which showed indications of good, fertile, and level, and of pleasing aspect."

It's just as likely that the smoke signals could have been controlled burning of brushlands, to prevent larger fires — or a warning of seafarers with lethal fire-sticks.

The fleet approached two islands, and two large rocks "shaped like sugar loaves." Vizcaíno named the group Islas de San Martin. Then he changed his mind. The four, probably reached on November 8 — the day of the "Cuatro Coronados" — became known as the Coronado Islands.

Vizcaíno ordered the San Diego to explore the islands. Although the water was 14 fathoms deep, writes his diarist, "the kelp extended...above the water." Some of it looked "as large as gourds...with fruit resembling very large capers and with tubes like sackbuts." The San Diego passed over kelp beds as if they "were a green meadow."

So many columns of smoke rose from the mainland that at night they resembled "a procession, and in the daytime the sky was overcast."

Beyond the Coronados, the expedition saw "a large, extended bay, surrounded by hills which form a very fine port." In 1542, Cabrillo had named the

bay San Miguel. Vizcaíno, who swore this couldn't be Cabrillo's discovery, would rename it San Diego. *Next time: Exploring San*

**Closer to Plastic Bag Ban** *Solana Beach* — **Nineteen** billion plastic bags are used each year in California, resulting in 147.000 tons of waste landing in state landfills.

On Wednesday, members of the Solana Beach **City Council decided to** reduce that waste, directing staff to draft an ordinance banning plastic bags.

When passed, Solana Beach will be the first city in the county to adopt such an ordinance.

"[The plastic bags] never go away, they don't decompose. [This ordinance] is long overdue and is about protecting our environment and clean beaches." councilmember Mike Nichols said during an October 26 city council meeting.

**Catholic Group Demands Money from** IRS

San Diego — Catholic Answers, a San Diegobased group "dedicated to serving Christ by bringing the fullness of Catholic truth to the world," announced last Friday that it will ask the U.S. Supreme Court to intervene and allow the organization to sue the Internal Revenue Service.

In 2004, the group sent two political emails to a subscriber group that specifically attacked self-proclaimed Catholic and then-presidential candidate John Kerry for his stance on abortion.

The IRS, in an investigation, ruled that the e-letters, since they specifically opposed the candidacy of an individual, constituted political expenditures. Catholic Answers was then ordered to pay excise taxes for 2004 and 2005. The IRS eventually reversed its decision, ruling that the alleged political activity "was not willful and flagrant." The agency refunded the taxes, along with interest.

In April 2009, Catholic Answers filed suit against the IRS in U.S. **District Court, claiming** that the levy was a First Amendment violation and demanding a return of the taxes paid. The case was thrown out, as a refund had already been issued.



#### Malapascua, Philippines **By Frances Aguilar**

"Bad Easter": that's the Spanish translation of Malapascua, the Philippine island we visited recently. But I like to call it "cheap-o Hawaii."

It has all the amenities Hawaii offers, including water sports, crystal-clear waters, exciting (and chill) nightlife, friendly locals, and sunbathing. All without the crowds and inflated prices you'll see in Hawaii.

Just off the coast of Cebu, this smaller Philippine island is a haven for scuba divers — beginners and experts. Although we didn't go on any scubadiving excursions, I recommend the restaurant at the Malapascua Exotic Dive Resort to taste the best iced coffee, feel a nice sea breeze, and smell delicious food cooking.

Malapascua is home to picturesque hikes along the shoreline and through its lush interior. Massages at the beach cost about \$10 (no, I didn't forget a "0"). Even our sea-view bungalow didn't set us back more than \$50 a night.

However, travel to Malapascua is not for the faint of heart. Being a typical city girl, I was not receptive to the three-hourplus, bumpy, non-air-conditioned bus ride from Cebu City to a small port where we took a wobbly boat, then a bigger open-air boat, and finally arrived at this small piece of heaven.

On the brighter side, I have great memories of the bus ride that provided us with Cebu's scenery and smells of tasty Filipino street food, the tiny boat allowing me to see for the first time the clarity of water surrounding Cebu, and the bigger boat giving us an extensive preview of the beauty surrounding Malapascua. Some destinations are worth all the hassle it takes getting there.

#### **Big Sur, California By Quinne Huffman**

Last New Year's Eve we waited online at *parks.ca.gov*, ready to book a campsite for the summer of 2011. We didn't want to miss our opportunity to reserve a spot in one of Big Sur's hike-in environmental campsites — they're typically booked up almost a year in advance.

We were lucky to get two nights in July. The site, \$30 a night, was located right above an 80-foot waterfall that drops into the ocean. It was wonderfully cool and pristine, surrounded by redwood, tan oak, madrone, and chaparral that framed an exquisite sunset over the Pacific.

#### FROM THE TRAILMASTER'S FAVORITES FOLDER

The past decade's relative lack of cold winter storms has made local cross-country skiing an increasingly rare activity. Originally published: December 17, 1998



Dowdery snow softly crunches beneath sunny skies as you kick and glide along the wide forest path. In the blue-shadowed


gloom of the oaks and pines, a doe bounces across your path, as if on a pogo stick. The morning air is crisp and nips your

nose and ears, but the exertion keeps you comfortably warm underneath thin, breathable lavers of clothing.

San Diego County's mountains aren't high enough to retain snow from winter storms for very long, but the crosscountry skiing scenario above has worked for me on several cold winter mornings over the past 15 years. If you have the right ski equipment, simply wait for a cold, wet storm to hit San Diego, arise early the next morning, and take off at vour earliest convenience for the Cuyamaca or the Laguna mountains. If you live in East County, areas for skiing lie as little as 30 minutes away via Interstate 8. Haste does not make waste — typically you'll have only a few hours of prime skiing conditions before the ascendant sun softens the snow and "snow bunnies" clog every parking lot and roadside turnout.

Several ski and outdoor shops around the county offer cross-country ski and boot rentals for those who might like to try out the sport. Also, don't forget tire chains - they may be required at the higher elevations.

The densely forested east slope of Cuyamaca Peak features more than one challenging route for cross-country skiers. The generously wide West Mesa and Fern Flat fire roads (accessible from a parking turnout at mile 7.3 on Highway 79) offer gentle gradients at altitudes



between 4000 and 5500 feet. The wide, south leg of the Azalea Glen Trail also works well for skiing, but not the narrower and steeper northern sections of that trail.

Experienced skiers can try the Lookout Road from Paso Picacho Campground (elevation 4750 feet) to the summit of Cuyamaca Peak (elevation 6512 feet) and back, 5.5 miles round trip. The strenuous ascent is followed by an at-times-terrifying descent back down, which is practical only when the snow is

soft and powdery (and not icy).

A longer, more gradual, and less nerve-wracking bid for Cuyamaca's summit can be made via West Mesa Fire Road. Fern Flat Fire Road, West Mesa Trail, Burnt Pine Trail, and finally the Lookout Road. The West Mesa and Burnt Pine trails are former fire roads and thus are somewhat wider and less steep than most hiking trails.

# **Maestro's Changeup**

#### SYMPHONY PLAYS CONCERT IN REVERSE

Local choral impresario Krishan

Oberoi invited me to the symphony on Saturday night, October 15. I accepted.

The concert started off heavy and maneuvered to increasingly buoyant pieces of music.

Richard Strauss composed *Metamorphasen: A Study for 23 Solo Strings*, in the aftermath of the Allied bombings in World War II. It is in many ways a lament for the destruction of the symbols of German culture.

This music exudes pathos, and Strauss makes his intentions clear near the conclusion. In the score he writes the words "In Memoriam" and then musically quotes a passage from the funeral march of Beethoven's third symphony *The Eroica*.

The strings of the San Diego Symphony achieved a level of sophisticated music-making. The interpretation of conductor Pinchas Zukerman trended toward the brisk.

In a live performance, sustaining a piece of music like *Metamorphasen* is a dangerous game, and a brisk tempo can keep the music in pathos instead of decaying to ponderous.

It is impossible to make this music sound trite, even with the quickest of tempos, and I've heard performances where the conductor has indulged in a slow tempo, and the results were rarely fruitful and at times dreadful.

The Schumann *Cello Concerto* was okay. Maestro Zukerman's wife, Amanda Forsyth, was the cello soloist. When she walked onstage, her appearance — platinum-blond hair contrasting with blazing red dress — sent a tremor through the audience.



Her playing was middle-ofthe-road. Some of her solo passages bordered on murkiness, some on brilliance.

The second half of the concert seemed to be a different night. After the heavy-hearted *Metamorphasen* and the average Schumann, Bach picked us up and dusted us off.

Zukerman played and conducted Bach's *Violin Concerto in E Major*. We witnessed what might be called "home base" for the maestro. Pinchas Zukerman has been a world-class violinist for nigh unto 40 years. Need I say more?


The concert closed with Mozart's *Symphony No. 35: Haffner.* Zukerman conducted without a score, and the orchestra pounced on this gem of a symphony. The final *Presto* section of the symphony was dashed off at breakneck speed and dispensed a satisfying conclusion to the evening.

The program notes mentioned that this music was selected by Mozart to open an "academy of his own music." I found it interesting that this piece was selected to close the concert.

I liked the change in programming. The tradition is to move from lighter music to heavier, and this program could have been reversed to be Bach, Mozart, Schumann, and Strauss, which would have also taken us chronologically through these Germanic composers. The change-up created a different experience.

There appeared to be a collection of symphony newbies in the audience. I say this because during the Bach, a faction in the audience applauded after the first movement.

I leaned over to Krishan and asked, "What's going on?" He didn't know. Venerable audience

members among us shook their heads in resignation as a smaller group applauded after the second movement as well.

All in all, it is encouraging that there were audience members who were unfamiliar with the applause patterns at the symphony. It means there were new ears in the audience. It means the symphony, at least for that night, had attracted a new group of patrons.

Well done.

#### BRING A SHOVEL: SCHOPENHAUER

You may need a shovel for this one because it could get deep.

"Music is thus by no means like the other arts, the copy of the Ideas, but the copy of the will itself, whose objectivity these Ideas are. This is why the effect of music is much more powerful and penetrating than that of the other arts, for they speak only of shadows, but it speaks of the thing itself." — Schopenhauer While Schopenhauer failed to provide evidence of objective truth, his philosophizing gives us a unique perspective on music.

"Music does not express this or that particular and definite joy, this or that sorrow, or pain, or horror, or delight, or merriment, or peace of mind; but joy, sorrow, pain, horror, delight, merriment, peace of mind themselves, to a certain extent in the abstract, their essential nature, without accessories, and therefore without their motives. Yet we completely understand them in this extracted quintessence. Hence it arises that our imagination is so easily excited by music."

What does Beethoven's Fifth Symphony mean? What is the value of the key of E flat? It is impossible to say. But Schopenhauer points out that we "completely understand them [the emotions of music] in this extracted quintessence."

# **Secret Love**

"Once, I had a secret love/ That lived within the heart of me./ All too soon, my secret love/ Became impatient to be free." So sang Doris Day in the Eisenhower-era film *Calamity Jane*. My own not-so-secret love for Peruvian cuisine dates to a Nixon-era road trip from California to Tierra del Fuego on the Pan Am "Highway" (bwaahha-ha!, with its 1000-plus miles of slippery cliffedge Andean mud and gravel). The two cuisines that won my top Pan American Idol honors were Mexican and Peruvian, the two most complex, nuanced, and, yes, spicy, of the cuisines I tasted along the route.

Café Secret doesn't look Peruvian. "It's like a British cottage in the Cotswolds," said my pal Fred, "someplace where Miss Marple might live." But on closer approach it's much larger, inside and out — in fact, it's got a four-room B&B attached to it. On one of those record-heat Indian summer days, the large, well-lighted front patio was the prime seating area (the cozy interior is better suited to winter).

Fred's coworker Flor had already arrived and claimed us a spacious four-top. A lovely *chilanga* (from Mexico City), she'd never tasted Peruvian cuisine before, and neither had Fred. We began with a cooling round of *chicha morada*, a nonalcoholic cider made from purple corn, fruits, and cinnamon. Sad to say, Secret's version was a thin, fruity juice, short on cinnamon. (Both Latin Chef in PB and Q'ero in Encinitas make more full-flavored renditions.) The wine list was in the throes of revision, so the waiter simply recited available choices, which included a sturdy, affordable screw-top Argentine Torrontes. We had a rather long wait for it. Service proved charming but leisurely, a little disorganized.

As we waited, we nibbled *canchitos*, salted corn kernels roasted until firm and nutty. When our appetizers arrived, I realized I'd way overordered, expecting that starters would be small plates, not laden platters. A popular dish from

Huancayo (a small Andean city south of Cuzco at 11,000 feet), Papitas con Yuca a la Huancaina consists of crisp-fried yucca root strips and

burly slabs of roast potato (you call those *papitas* — "little potatoes?" Ahem!). They're robed in a smooth, creamy, slightly tangy and surprisingly light white cheese sauce made with Mexican *queso* 

*fresco* — a better choice than the too-dry, tootangy feta cheese that some stateside restaurants substitute for the unavailable llama cheese. The little *pica* of hot pepper was welcome, as was the crunchy texture of the yucca amending the more typical all-potato version. Quibble: the dish shouldn't be white, as here, but golden, a color much valued in Inca cuisine, from a yellow leaf called *palillo*, or yellow chilies (*ají amarillo*) — or even a pinch of turmeric.

We returned to sea level with the Ceviche Mixto, a lime-spiked mixture of blanched shellfish

and sea bass, plus citrus-pickled onions with a pleasant nip of hot pepper and soothing baked sweetpotato slices. The array includes a huge, tentacled prawn in the shell, a scallop and a mussel on their

shells, plus firm shrimp and rather chewy calamari rings. The big prawn looks like an undersea monster threatening Captain Jack Sparrow. Treat it like a crawfish: break it at the waist, cut open the center-line, and gobble the tail-meat. Arrgh!

The waiter delivered our dish of Causa with apparent pride. It's small but intense: pressed potatoes layered with crab meat, Peruvian pepper aioli, and avocado slices, with a couple of



salty shrimp on the side. This is luxury food, a spud foie gras from the land where potatoes were domesticated. It's slightly spicy when eaten at the restaurant, but grows fiery in the doggiebox overnight.

Budget travelers, bide-a-wee here. The above dishes constitute a delicious, fulfilling dinner for two for \$57 (plus bevs, tip, tax, of course). But entrées are reasonable, too (averaging about





\$20), and even more gargantuan. There are only four choices on the printed menu, but a chalkboard lists the day's specials, and attention must be paid. That's where we found the splendid Chupe (seafood chowder), clunking with denizens of the deep (the same gang as in the ceviche), and packing a little heat, too. It soothes and inflames simultaneously - coastal cooking worthy of a good restaurant in Lima. If you love Mexican soups, it's something like Vuelve a la Vida but with a thicker broth. Unfortunately, it made our fine Pescado a lo Macho (sautéed snapper with scallops, mussels, shrimp, and squid in a creamy pepper sauce) rather redundant.

I found our third entrée problematic. While I'll do anything for a good Causa, I'd go anywhere to find a great Ají de Gallina (hen with peppers) like the one I ate in Cuzco: tender chicken in a thick, golden, incendiary sauce of garlic, onions, breadcrumbs, milk, chicken stock, ground walnuts, Parmesan cheese,





and hot peppers, all served over potatoes, hard-cooked egg, a few Kalamata-style olives, with a side of rice. (While "ají is a generic word for all manner of chili peppers in South America, hot or mild, "Ah-hee!" is how the word should be pronounced for the Cuzqueño renditions.) While working on my first cookbook, Totally Hot, I gathered a half-dozen recipes for the dish, including a handwritten version from a friend's abuela in Cuzco. They were all pretty similar, so I went mainly with grannie's version.

But Peruvian restaurants in San Diego don't seem to follow this recipe tradition. It's one thing to cool it out a little for the gringos, but remember Clara ("Where's the beef?") Peller? Well, where's the *ají*? The dish is way too mild and creamy at Q'ero, still too mild at Latin Chef, and too mild and dry at Café Secret. Fred and Flor, ají-virgins with no expectations, both liked it quite a lot. This rendition is a heap of none-too-tender chicken breast strips with a tart flavor, minimal sauce, and no

real heat, with whole walnuts rather than ground ones, all flung over the requisite taterand-egg accompaniments with a single cured olive on top. There isn't even any hot sauce at the tables to amend it. (Maybe they make one, but it wasn't offered, and if they have bottled Mexican hot sauces, you don't want them anyway for Peruvian dishes — Peru's fiery *rocoto* chili is a remote cousin to Mexico's chilies, with a different flavor.)

Alternative entrée choices include poached snapper with white wine sauce and quinoa pilaf, and a popular dish drawn from Lima's long-standing Chinese community, *lomo saltado*, stir-fried beef strips with soy-based sauce, here with yucca fries rather than the more traditional french fries. Spinach-and-cheese ravioli with pesto provides a vegetarian option — yes, urbane Lima abounds in Italian restaurants.

For dessert, we were tempted by *tres leches* cake and by key lime meringue pie, but we finally chose the divine *alfajore*, a large, light, and crumbly cookie stuffed with *dulce de leche*. The espresso is from Illy, so who could ask for more?

I could, of course — more spice, more authenticity. Still, this is a charming, comfortable environment to discover Peruvian cuisine for yourself. I prefer the cooking at the tiny Latin Kitchen in Pacific Beach, where the owner is a stickler for authenticity and goes to great lengths to buy Peruvian spices and peppers. But if you're looking for creature comforts in which to casually explore an exciting new cuisine, Café Secret is no secret anymore. ■

beautiful. She's singing along with the Beatles tune on the sound system, "And I Love Her," looking at the tiny baby in her arms, and when it comes to the last line, she makes it "...and I love you."

This is happening in a little restaurant in Uptown. There's

only me, a couple of others at the back, the chef, the server. Still, this gal is fearless, sitting in the window seat. Then her guy comes in. She hands him the baby.

"Six weeks," she says when I ask how old the kid is.

The place we're in is called Savory Deli & Market. Easy to miss.

I almost did. I was sauntering down Park Boulevard, passing under the University Heights sign at about 8:00. Love this part of town at night. It glows. I resisted the temptation of places like El Zarape, Soltán Banoo, and was almost to Adams when I saw a sign in a window: "Gazpacho."

Gazpacho! My dad loved that. He used to make it for us when he felt the world wasn't such a bad place, after all. It's one of those hot-weather Spanish

soups, served cold. Then I see the sign that says, "Specializing in the regional foods of Spain, France, Italy." And another sign: "Paella Saturday." I've never cottoned to paella, big jambalaya mess of mostly rice, but it has its fanatics. I want to be cool and love it and its saffron whatever...maybe some Saturday. Meanwhile: gazpacho!

I walk into this half-deli, half-eatery. The eating side's modest. Cream paint, black tables, black chairs. Red back wall. But then they've spiced it up with full-size flags. French, Italian,

Sicilian (red and yellow, with three running legs sprouting out from the Medusa head at the center), Corsican. The flags drape the walls and

ceilings. They give it a weirdly good vibe.

But Mike the server-owner says no more gazpacho today — they're out. I check the rest of the menu. Sandwiches and soups and salads. "But our bread is different," says Mike. "*Piadina*.

From Romagna, Italy. It goes back to the 1300s. We learned how to make it when we were over there."

It turns out Mike and the chef, co-owner Julius, spent most of the past decade in Italy, France, and Spain, studying how folks cooked. "We were reverse explorers," Mike says. They have five *piadina* sandwiches, all in

the \$7 range. The prosciutto

La Mancha, like Don Quixote) and quince paste. I remember eating quince as a kid. Tasted — and looked — like a strange yellow apple-pear. So that sounds interesting, too.

cheese (Manchego means from

Then Mike throws me a curve. "Are you really hungry? Because we have pastas, and…let me check." He heads off to where Julius is slaving away in the kitchen.

While he's gone, I check out the pastas. One really grabs me: pasta *lunghe* (long pasta) with mussels in a garlic-wine sauce (small \$5.40, large \$10.80). Oh, man. Gotta have that.

"Yes!" says Mike when he gets back. "Julius made a beef bourguignon today. And he still has some..."

Decisions, decisions. Just so happens I l-o-v-e beef bourguignon, despite disappointments, like the watery stews you so often get. In the end, I go for both, the small pasta *lunghe and* the plate of beef bourguignon (even though it's \$12), plus a small coffee (\$1.45, with refills). Farewell, Jackson.

They are definitely both worth it. The dish of spaghetti with four mussels, lots of garlic, an awesome wine sauce, and chunks of French bread to sop it all up — it's heaven. I'm bread-wiping my bowl clean and dry when Mike arrives with the beef stew (that's what it is, except the beef's been soaked in wine and herbs, which make it as far from Irish stew as, oh, Mars is from Earth). Mike says they marinate it in burgundy for a morning and slow-cook all day. The meat is fall-away tender, winey, garlicky, with pearl onions, 'shrooms, and pancetta — a kind of Italian bacon — to sex it up.

I say to Mike, "All we need is a glass of red plonk."

"We're expecting our wine-and-beer license any day," he says. "But you're always welcome to bring in your own."

That's when Roger, Eliza, and their six-weekold baby, Raiden, come in. They order gnocchi (potato dumplings, small \$4.99, large \$7.99) and the *piadina* alioli. They tell me they love them both.

Roger's an artist. Eliza's a singer and actress, an expert in accents. She's from L.A., and she's voiced "most of the chick voices" on South Park. "And I'm Rebecca in [the game] *Assassin's Creed II*."

So this is the point when Roger takes off (to check parking? take a phone call?) and Eliza starts singing to baby Raiden, along with McCartney on the sound system. The few of us in here stop eating and listen.

"Bright are the stars that shine

- Dark is the sky
  - I know this love of mine
  - Will never die..."

I ask Eliza about her singing, 'cause, man, that's quite a voice. "I might be getting together with Shawn Rohlf. You know, 7th Day Buskers?"

Uh, wracking my brain. I should know who this is...

Julius is stacking chairs when Eliza, Roger, Raiden, me, and the two other stragglers finally get out of here.

It's that kind of place.

#### I'm Not As Think As You Drunk I Am!

Since the San Diego Reader's annual food issue hit the streets, I've received queries asking about my list of great local craft-beer spots.

Mostly they're from folks in the know, wondering how somewhat surprising venues got selected over some of their favorite places.

Their concerns are valid. A list missing spots such as Blind Lady Ale House, Urge Gastropub, and Stone Brewing World Bistro & Gardens is one I, as a San Diego beer geek, would have serious questions about were I to come across it as a reader. So, I'd like to explain what wasn't explained in this year's edition.

When we, the writers who contributed our picks, were given this assignment, we were provided nine distinct regions (e.g. The Mesas, Mid-City, etc.). Each region was comprised of several neighborhoods, with the North County region taking up the most acreage and including everything north of Kearny Mesa on the inland side and Solana Beach on the coast.

That's a lot of real estate in an area that boasts a number of quality craft-beer establishments. Among those are Stone, Pizza Port Carlsbad, Urge Gastropub, Encinitas Ale House, and a slew of others who can now pile on over being left out not once, but twice.

In the end, I went with Churchill's Pub, a deserving spot that's been doing right by the craft-brewing industry for a long time. I don't apologize for that selection, but I feel it's important that people who care about the subject of craft beer understand that many of those who had to be left out based strictly on geography actually rank higher in the county suds scene than some who made the final list.

The most challenging region encompassed North Park, South Park, Golden Hill, Normal Heights, and University Heights. Choosing between Blind Lady Ale House, Toronado, Small Bar, Eleven, and eventual winner. Hamilton's Tavern, was very Sophie's Choice.

They all have a ton going for them and can beat the tap handles off some of the winners, but that doesn't take away from the fact that the places on our list this year all won the crown based on the regions we were assigned. They deserve a tip of the stein, but I'd be remiss if I didn't acknowledge the incredible also-rans who missed out based on a technicality.

Sunrise. Chris Barre. Sitting on top of El Capitan. Lotus position. Could see forever. Noticed how the rising sun appeared stuffed between two layers of cloud.

"That's it," he said to himself. "Stuffed." He stood up. Yelled across the valley below. "Stuffed!"

Or something like that. Chris is the executive chef of the brand-new, week-old El Cajon Brewing Company microbrew pub-eatery (110 N. Magnolia, between Main Street and Douglas Avenue, 619-873-0221).

I popped in late, around 10:30 p.m. He's sitting here at the bar, nursing an end-of-shift glass of Merlot.

I've just ordered a Belgian Pale Ale (\$3.50), made right here in those shiny vats behind the counter, and a jalapeño stuffed burger (\$8.95) with cream cheese, jalapeños, and bacon stuffed in the actual meat patty.

This is Chris's great invention. Maybe not on El Capitan. Maybe he was making the bed and accidentally left a pillow between the sheets. Whatever. It could change burgerdom across

the planet. Or at least here. "I suggested to Steve [Meadows, the guy who opened this place last week with his brewer brother Dave]: 'How's about a stuffed hamburger — a burger loaded with a stuffed meat patty?"

Chris's initial idea: the one stuffed with cream cheese, jalapeños, and bacon.

"Then Steve came up with the Greek (feta cheese, olives, and purple onions), and then we did an Italian, with mozzarella, pepperoni, and sausage. People have gone crazy over them."

Steve Meadows runs the place. His brother Dave makes the beer.

It must have worked. Chris says the first week has been huge. "We have 324 seats. People have come and filled them all. No soft opening. Too busy, too soon; but I'm not complaining. The staff held up incredibly."

My burger arrives just as I see I coulda had the Ultimate (\$9.95), where they dip your burger in beer batter and deep fry the whole dang thing.

Still, this is scrumptious. The patty kind of bursts with hot cheese in your mouth. And, boy, does it go with the Belgian ale, which, actually, tastes a little wine-ish, now that I think about it.

Next time I'll have to try the Italian. Maybe pair it with the the El Cajones IPA. I'll need the burger: the El Cajones is 7.5 percent.

But you look around and you can see: El Cajonians are just a little prouder, now that they have beers they can call their own



Yet More Musical Chefs: Delicias You've read already about Amy DiBiase taking over the kitchen at the Shores. I think it's great — I think she'll work beautifully with manager/sommelier Lisa Redwine in a woman-run team. High time that more women were in power positions in restaurants.

And you've probably read Brandon's post about Jason Maitland's replacement by Brian Redzikowski at Flavors Del Mar.

Now, here's something of a shocker. Chef Paul McCabe (whom many consider one of the best in SD) — after seven years at Kitchen 1540 at L'Auberge Del Mar — is moving to Delicias in Rancho Santa Fe in mid-November, even as Delicias itself undergoes major changes.

Delicias was known for its beautiful edible garden (even back when growing on-site was a rarity, before the recent rise of the rabid locavore). Originally, Wolfgang Puck was involved in it in some way, possibly as an investor. Recently, the restaurant's latest chef, Michael Knowles, was hired after stints at two of Puck's Las Vegas outposts.

But the customer base had evidently dropped considerably over the past ten years. Maybe the food had lost a certain spark. So I've heard from former regulars, who used to travel all the way from the East Bay to shop at Chino Farms first thing Saturday morning and then lunch at Delicias.

Maybe the place lost its Puckish *eclat.* Let's face it, the more famous, celeb-catching Milles Fleurs gobbles up most of the diners who'll travel to this rather remote location for what the trade calls "fine food." And there probably aren't enough locals living in RSF to keep any fine restaurant alive all by themselves.

Delicias won *Wine Spectator's* Best Award of Excellence for 2011 with its huge inventory of bottlings, but apparently its food needed work to equal its bevs.

So it's presto change-o time. Manager Alex Campbell wants to change the menu to make it more "approachable...more upscale casual." (Does that mean lower prices?) No more tablecloths, and with a greater emphasis on modern American cuisine. The restaurant will shut down in January for physical renovations and then the owners hope to open four more branches of Delicias.

As for McCabe, he was creatively ready to open his own restaurant, but logistically that's difficult, with the need to find investors, get licenses, etc. Here, McCabe can just step right into a more intimate venue than the huge 1540.

At least until the owners start building the four branches.

#### Sushi Going Beyond Sapporo and Kirin in Coronado

I am a fan of sushi, but I eat less of it than I'd like. I've often pondered why that is and have developed a theory. All too often, it's offered without quality beer to wash it down. I consider this a missed opportunity, since this style of cuisine has a lot going for it as far as food and beer pairability is concerned.

I can think of no better palate-cleansing option for sinus-clearing wasabi than a swig of a citric IPA (make it a West Coast double). And lighter styles such as pilsner, wheat beers, bocks, and saisons match the clean, poignant flavors of raw, fresh seafood and items such as *uni* and fish roe.

If you've never tried craft beer with sushi, a great opportunity is coming up via a beer-pairing dinner at Saiko Sushi. A new addition to the Coronado restaurant scene, Saiko has been open just over a month but is generating a buzz and business from islanders behind a chef who was offered the head sushi chef job at Harney Sushi. Instead he proceeded with a venture all his own, where he could bring his distinct fusionistic style to diners without compromise.

The dinner, October 25 at 7 p.m., will include six courses paired with beer from Saiko's Orange Avenue neighbors, Coronado Brewing Company. Among the pairings on the menu is a new-style Hamachi sashimi with a reduction of blood orange (served with Orange Avenue Wit), a salmon roll with Szechuan albacore tartare and chipotle-pomegranate purée (Mermaid Red), and a dessert of chocolate chawamushi (steamed custard) with a sweet beer sabayon and Chinese five-spice whipped cream (Stoopid Stout).

Asian food and American craft beer — there is no better interpretation on the East meets West model.

This is what I'm looking at: "The Tri-Tip. Coffee spice rubbed tri-tip [beef] topped with juicy roma tomatoes, mixed greens, smoked gouda cheese, and our roasted-garlic mayo, \$7."

For 2-1/2 years Karijanian has been trying out sandwich combos on his customers here. The Tri-Tip has been his triumph.

"I played around with rubbing the tri-tip with spices and coffee. Dry rub instead of marinating," he says. "I thought it was pretty interesting. So we tried it as a special. Then people kept asking for it. Now it's our most popular sandwich."

Karijanian claims he has "hands down, the best tri-tip in San Diego." And the meat certainly looks beautiful. He slices it then heats it then adds it to the rest of the focaccia combo.

For me, it took a little extra sprinkle of salt and pepper to wake it up, but once you did - oh, man, the pink meat, the coffee notes playing deep like a cello, the smoky gouda, the crispy focaccia. This was a sandwich made in heaven.

He has others, like the Brie, a turkey sandwich with Granny Smith apple slices, brie cheese, and cranberry sauce (\$7). Or the variation, the Thanksgiving. It's also turkey but with veggie stuffing, mixed greens, muenster cheese, and cranberry, \$6.50. Each time, sweet and savory.

"That was a great thing with my grandmother, who taught me so much," says Karijanian. "She was Armenian, and that combination is what it's all about."

#### So Much for Blanca **Part Two**

Blanca, a fine-dining restaurant, settled down in Solana Beach several years ago but never really settled in. The place was sleek, the kind of white-leather wonder where nobody ever really got to feel comfortable, despite the owners' intentions that diners do just that.

But customers weren't the only thing Blanca's ownership had trouble keeping around. Chefs came and went with the greatest frequency of just about any dining establishment in San Diego over the past three years. First there was Wade

Hageman, who produced gorgeous and delicious food before booking it up Highway 101 to Encinitas, where he continues to earn raves for his farm-to-table pie hideaway, Blue Ribbon Artisan Pizzeria.

Next up was a guy I won't mention by name. I'm still steaming from his parting words — "all San Diegans want are fish tacos" — insinuating that our county isn't capable of appreciating gourmet cuisine (which he wasn't producing anyway, so it's sort of a moot point).

Then came Gavin Schmidt, a forager who won over the local media as well as Blanca regulars. Still, Blanca failed to be a draw

So, the owners closed their doors and began working with Schmidt on plans to relocate to a more centralized part of town where they could attract a more loyal and foodcentric clientele. At least that was the plan. I just received official word that Blanca part two is history. The owners are moving to Texas to lick their wounds and start a new concept. Schmidt will be staying here, which is probably a good thing. It's always sad to lose a good chef, and even in his brief time at Blanca's helm he proved he's got the chops.



Says something about \$2.99 breakfasts, too. A roadrunner moment later, I'm back at O'Hungry's, this woody, kinda Wild West place with wooden floor, wooden chairs and tables, and pub-y timbered ceiling.

I order the BBQ ribs. Can't believe they're just five bucks, but Andrea the waitress says it happens every day 4:30 till close, around nine.

I ask for a beer. Bud Light. Says \$4 on the menu. "Actually we only charge \$1," she says, "for your first three mugs. After that it goes back to \$4."

Lawdy. Andrea says the owner, Stan Chu, figures these are hard times, and he needs to meet his customers halfway. I'd say this is more than half, Stan.

The ribs are fine — three of them. Big, meaty...okay, not totally Texas BBQ rip-roaring seared-flavor feel, but plentiful and with plenty of veggies to round them out. And six bucks all in? Unbelievable.

This is when I notice Krizanto, the elderly mariachi. Doing the rounds of the tables.

#### **Cooks Confab Rides** Again

Once one of the San Diego dining scene's most exciting developments and biggest draws, Cooks Confab has been on a bit of a hiatus. Or at least they've slowed down from the breakneck pace that saw this consortium of gourmands putting on extensive events every few months.

Those affairs always featured creative dishes built around theme ingredients, ranging from truffles to eggs to craft beer. Such a format allowed the Confab to educate attendees by exposing them to the wide array of culinary preparations and variations that could be applied to each of the central edibles.

As a foodie who enjoyed attending Confab events, I have felt a sense of loss at their infrequency. Dining enthusiasts who feel the same will be happy to learn that several members of the Confab will be putting on an event on October 24, a multicourse, plated meal built not around an ingredient but a cooking method: confit.

That term refers to cooking something slowly in its own fat. Duck legs are the most common confit ingredient, and they will be on the menu, as will confit of pork, tuna, fruit and - easily the most interesting of the bunch — gizzards.

Participating chefs include Amy DiBiase from The Shores Restaurant, Christian Graves from Jsix, Katie Grebow from Café Chloe, and Tim Kolanko from A.R. Valentien, along with Olivier Bioteau, owner and executive chef of the host venue, University Heights' Farm House Café.

The price per person is \$65 (\$85 with wine), and part of the proceeds from the evening, which includes two seatings, will benefit Slow Food Urban San Diego.

"Graham crackers, chocolate chip, caramel, walnuts, and coconut," says Brenda when I ask what's in it.

Brenda's a cheery blonde lady who hasn't been afraid of adventure. She's lived in Colombia, Venezuela, Panama, Barcelona, all over. Three years ago she set up here in PB and called it Mad Dogs Café

Why Mad Dogs?

"Because we have a mad array of hotdogs," she says. "From bangers — the traditional English sausage — to bratwurst to chorizo. Ten different kinds."

They range from \$3.99 to \$4.99. For \$6.99 they also do "extreme" hotdogs such as alligator, ostrich, and duck.

Longtime employee Andrew has tried them all. He likes the "slightly fishy" taste of alligator.

The other thing they do here which you don't see a lot of:

crumpets. It's like an English muffin but softer, like a pancake (\$1.99 with butter, more with flavorings like ricotta honey and almond).

And a ton of all-day breakfasts (\$6.49-\$8.49). They also bake their own chips here (\$2.49).





He works with a partner named Budd Willis. "He's been my banker and my right-hand man in every show I've put on." Is Willis a banker by trade? "No, he's just an honest guy in the community who really cares like I do."



#### We Got the Beats.

"I've always been seeking out exploratory music," says Santino (or Sonny, like in The Godfather) Romeri, a Golden Hill-via-Chula Vista experimental beat musician (Illuminauts), promoter, and overseer of boutique vinyl and cassette label Kill Quanti.

"I'd run my tape player into my guitar pedals and play Lee Scratch Perry through it. I've also been into R&B since I was really young. But it wasn't until about five years ago that I picked up a sampler and ran it through my pedals, and I've been refining my style ever since."

That style has come to include nods to noise (Romeri cites Per Mission, Soul-Junk, and Three One G Records), hip-hop, and ambient music. "Generally, we'll have a

few samples and a key, some changes, but it's loosely structured," says Romeri, a 26-yearold web and graphic designer by trade. "There's a good amount of improvisation. We take cues from free jazz, where there's a theme but everyone's doing their own thing." Equipped with SP404

"It's been a slow start," says Romeri, "but now there's a big local audience [for beat music], which is what I'm focusing on

Romeri's recorded repertoire includes a track for an

samplers, synths, loop stations, effects boxes, and turntables, Romeri (former guitarist of Get Back Loretta) and a rotating cast, including Nicky Castañeda and David Peña, have shared the stage with Zach Hill, Danny Harrison (George's son), and Subtle (Doseone).

"Kill Quanti has been



this growing idea for about two years now. Booking and bringing the beat scene to San Diego — Gaslamp Killer, Teebs, Strangeloop, Schlomo, Ras G — anybody exploratory with electronics. Stuff I really believe in."

Kill Quanti is set to assassinate with a pending ten-inch vinyl split of local's eLan (a Critical Beatdown resident soon to tour Europe with Modeselektor's label Monkeytown) and DJ Pound, who was recently sampled by D-Styles at Los Angeles' renowned Low End Theory weekly showcase.

"San Diego is legendary for its music," says Romeri. "I want to keep that legacy going."

## **Painful Places**

## *"I cannot afford to do things that make me feel so bad about myself."*

orth Park singer/songwriter Carmen Caserta was 19 when she dragged her piano from L.A. to San Diego, originally to attend college. "I got my undergraduate degree in psychology

and then started law school in 2008," she says, "but I was playing and singing in secret at home, every day, for around seven years."

With a notebook full of songs and encouragement from locals such as performer/producer Astra Kelly, Caserta recorded a four-song EP called *Years* in late 2010. "Musically, I'm the lovechild of Fiona Apple, Tori Amos, and Adele. The songs are pieces of my soul, feelings in my heart: vulnerable, gut-level, and sometimes uncomfortably exposed revelations."

Caserta's debut full-length *The Hive*, recorded at Capricorn Studios in S.D., was released in September. Now playing live shows around town, she says her concert persona is most influenced by the aforementioned Tori Amos.

"The first time I saw her was at the Greek Theatre in L.A. when I was 13, and I remember moments when her expression was so unbridled and intense that I actually felt uncomfortable, because she was triggering such painful places for me. She has the power to evoke an enormous range of emotion, from pain, anger, grief, and the horrifying feeling of being sexually violated, to courage, strength, and empowerment. She uses her entire being as the catalyst for this experience."

#### TO MENTION?

"Lady Gaga, 'Poker Face' — but it's the acoustic version, so it's okay. All personal feelings about Gaga aside, that chick plays a mean piano, and she can actually sing her ass off."

#### WHAT'S YOUR ETHNIC HERITAGE?

"I'm a first-generation American on my father's side. He's a native Italian, and the only member of his family to ever leave Italy. Such courage!"

#### WHERE DO YOU HANG OUT?

"I live by Bird Park and Morley Field, which are quite lovely, and I've recently committed to getting out into nature once a week to give myself some relaxation and connect with the natural world."

#### **BIGGEST LIE YOU EVER TOLD?**

"'No, I'm not stoned.' Or maybe that's just the most frequent lie I've told."

#### WHO MAKES OUT IN YOUR WILL?

"The coolest stuff I have would be my grandparents' upright piano, a treasure chest full of my life's writings, and my shoe collection. My hubby would get my piano, even though he doesn't play, my 14-year-old sister Sabrina would get my shoes, and I've already posted a sticky-note instruction on my treasure chest [stating] that all the contents must be burned and never read. Those go to the fairies and ghosts."

#### FIRST TIME DRUNK?

"When we were 12 or 13, my best friend and I stole a bottle of vodka from the drugstore. We used Hawaiian Punch as a chaser, until I realized what a waste of time and stomach space that was. I ended up drinking most of the bottle and blacking out. Flashes of memory still remain, such as running into the street crying hysterically and sitting on my neighbor's lawn chanting 'Stop the rain,' even though it wasn't raining. I woke up face down in the grass in a pool of my own vomit. Not a pretty story, I know."

## SONG THAT BEST DESCRIBES YOUR LIFE?

"Fiona Apple, 'Extraordinary Machine': "Be kind to me/ Or treat me mean/ I'll make the most of it/ I'm an extraordinary machine."

#### MOST MONEY EVER SPENT ON NOTHING?

"On my last trip to New York City, the ultimate danger zone for a compulsive shopper like me, I bought a Jimmy Choo bag. Now, hold on a second, it was 40 percent off retail. It had that irresistible, manipulative allure, but it was still sickeningly expensive. I felt so guilty and ashamed after I bought the damned thing that I couldn't even use it for more than a week. I was a total fraud, walking around with that thing, pretending like it was a true reflection of who I am and what I can afford. I put it up for sale online, but no luck. It's just sitting on the top shelf of my closet, an ever-present reminder that I cannot



Surprisingly, the disc came across as a bit of a disappointment



"Spazz" and "Tune Grief" both display a hyperactive side that has been missing from most of Malkmus's output since Brighten the Corners. Also of note is "Gorgeous Georgie," which strikes the perfect balance between pop sensibilities and a sneaky guitar solo. It's not often that a five-minute song breezes by so quickly.

Beck's production on this disc is worthy of accolades as well. His secret weapons here are subtle effects (especially on vocals) at key moments.

## HERE'S DEAL

Last Call lastcallsd.com

Boasting a weekend happy hour from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m., **Last Call**'s slogan entreats you to "Go ugly early." And while easily dismissed as another sketchy El Cajon Boulevard hole, Last Call proves to be a welcoming neighborhood joint that owner Rich Walker calls an "oasis on the Boulevard."

"I opened Last Call eight years ago with a friend from when I worked at Dick's Last Resort," says Walker. "We were looking for a name that would catch and were surprised to find that 'Last Call' was available. There were only four nationally, though now there are a ton."

Is it the quintessentially terrible karaoked "Don't Stop Believin'," the oddly inland tiki surf decor, or the walls adorned with Walker's own artwork (made with recycled, reclaimed, and natural materials) that gives Last Call its convivial locals' bar charm?

"We're all family here," former bartendergone-regular Mike tells me. "We look out for each other." You can spot family past on Last Call's "Wall of Shame," a collection of over 500 Polaroids on film that went out of production two years ago.

"It's just regulars, some guy acting stupid, girls... whatever," Walker says. "If you take out a digital camera, girls think you're a pervert, but everyone's happy to smile for a Polaroid."

Making light of the venue's location, Last Call offers \$1 kamikaze shooters when sirens pass, though some nights it has to be limited to east or westbound. A handful of taps include Manzanita IPA and Red from Santee, both excellent brews at \$4 a pint. Otherwise, 22 bottled beers include Stone, Manzanita, and New Belaium selections, but the house special is the Sunken Sailor, a shot of Sailor Jerry's rum dropped in a glass of Monster energy drink.

Catch karaoke on Wednesdays and Thursdays, live bands on Fridays, hiphop Saturdays, and football on Sundays and Mondays. "I first came here to play

fantasy football," says J.T., a traveling carnival electrician. "Once you're in here, it grows on you. It's the great-

est little bar in San Diego."

## **Senior Moments**

They strategize like young soldiers, forgetting that they're almost immobile.

B ack in the '60s, Robert Anderson wrote a one-act called *I'm Herbert*. Depending on how old you are, it could be a comedy or a tragedy. In the play, a man and a woman, senior citizens, try to communicate. But senility warps their words into an Abbott and Costello "Who's

on first?" routine. If you're young, the old geezers' inability to connect makes for hilarious theater of the absurd. If you're beyond a certain age, however, they become

chilling previews of coming attractions.

Gerald Sibleyras's *Heroes* at North Coast Rep uses a similar device. Henri, Philippe, and Gustave, veterans of World War I, were heroes 41 years ago. Now it's 1959 and they're patients at an old-soldiers' home in rural France. And they're stuck. Henri lost a leg in battle; Philippe has a piece of shrapnel in his head and passes out every ten minutes; and the aristocratic Gustave — who won medals in both World Wars — finds safety inside the walls and doesn't dare venture out.

The play combines traces of *I'm Herbert* with Samuel Beckett's *Waiting for Godot* and Jean-Paul Sartre's *No Exit* (where "hell is other people"). Because most days are identical and ruled by devastating boredom, the trio does, and does not, get along. The walled-in terrace where they spend their days (nicely replicated by Marty Burnett for



NCRT) feels more and more like a prison, from which they plan an unlikely escape. It's actually a campaign: they want to climb to

a stand of poplar trees on a far-off hill. They strategize like young soldiers, all the while forgetting that they're almost immobile. The gap between the

> two — fading memories of youth, diminishment of old age — creates both humor and pathos.

Tom Stoppard's impressionistic translation leaves out basic information. We learn snippets about the trio, but concrete explanations are few. We're perer

but concrete explanations are few. We're never told why Gustave is agoraphobic (or even that he is; we deduce it from his behavior) or how Henri lost his leg. Or when Philippe is having a spell or just faking one for laughs. The play's more a painting by Claude Monet than, say, Cezanne.

In effect, *Heroes* frames the story through the lens of an octogenarian. It's probably not unique, but the point of view is striking. The playwright doesn't have all the facts. His characters exist in a wavering now, four decades from their battlefield heroics. Our sense of their pasts is as vague as theirs. The script has "senior moments" by design.

The North Coast Repertory Theatre has cast three heroes of regional theater: Ken Ruta (Gustave) is cofounder of the Guthrie Theatre and associate artist at the Old Globe; Ray Rein-

hardt (Henri) is cofounder of ACT in San Francisco; and San Diego's own Jonathan McMurtry (Philippe) won a Craig Noel Lifetime Achievement Award. It's a dream cast, but the night I caught the show, the performances felt under-rehearsed with many line troubles. As a result, their rhythms were off and the pace lagged. One often had the sense that each was waiting on the others.

Directed by David Ellenstein, the overall production felt heavy-handed, while the play calls for the lightest of touches. Some scenes struck chords, as when the trio practiced roping themselves for the climb with a fire hose. Their frustrated entanglement was both farcical and sad. But too often lulls intruded and momentum was lost.

When Ion Theatre announced it would stage *Gypsy*, one of the greatest musicals of all time, in its small space, I said, "Huh?" When I saw the results, all I could say was, "Oh, my!" Ion has shrunk the piece to fit a two-car garage. If you're expecting production numbers with a cast of thousands, steer clear. But on its own terms, the Ion downsizing works — even works wonders — on a human scale.

In Cygnet Theatre's *Glass Menagerie*, Amanda Sitton plays fragile Laura Wingfield as if born for the role. At Ion, Linda Libby exudes the same aura as Mama Rose, the stage mother from Hell. The librettist Arthur Laurents wrote about Rose: "If you try to live your childrens' lives, you'll destroy yourself."

"You'll be swell," Libby/ Rose sings to daughter Louise, "you'll be GREAT!" In no time the words evolve from Broadway dream to a formal, military command, and then to Rose trying to will success in her daughter, practically shoving it down her throat. Libby commands the stage throughout, but her unfettered desperation gains magnitude from the intimate Ion Theatre space. Rose will not be defeated again.

*Gypsy* is a backstage musical. Designer Karin Filijan's somber, "worklight" effects give the songs a personal, behindthe-scenes touch: the characters sing just to each other, not past the footlights to the back of the house (when Libby does sing out, in the dynamite "Rose's Turn," it's to an imaginary audience, and Rose almost loses her mind). Another unexpected bonus: the singers aren't miked! These are actual voices — for once.

Backed by Wendy Thompson's precise, indefatigable piano, the cast obviously relishes this enterprise. Katie Whalley (remember the name) gives young Louise a sweeping arc from pageboy shyness to bombastic Gypsy Rose Lee. Andy Collins is just right as Herbie, the husband drained of devotion. As June, the daughter meant to be the star, Helena Marie Woods has a horse laugh that's priceless.

*Gypsy* broke a lot of ground when first produced in 1959. Along with a difficult central character, Stephen Sondheim's lyrics favored the vernacular. Sondheim also summed up the theme: "Gypsy says something fairly hard to take: that every child eventually has to become responsible for his parents." ■

documentary by Danfung Dennis, this is the response of 18-year-old Nathan Harris when asked in a military interview why he wants to join the Marines. Perhaps more frightening than Harris's comment is the response from the interviewer: "That's the best answer I've ever heard."

This conversation is recollected by Harris when he is 25, now a sergeant in the U.S. Marine Corps. For his third tour in Afghanistan, Harris is selected as a member of the elite Echo Company, who have been charged with taking the war deep into Talibancontrolled territory. They are, as the commanding officer says, "experts in the application of violence." Harris is shot in the hip, leaving his prospect of returning to service questionable. His welcome-home sequence is effectively interspliced with quick cutaways to soldiers in the grips of despair, suicidal behavior, and physical maladies.

As we follow Harris's recovery, the editing is used to take the viewer back to the deserts of Afghanistan, where we are privy to actual footage from the battlefield leading up to Harris's injury. Even without the flashback technique, the battle footage would be compelling. The camera is remarkably steady, given the roughness of the terrain and the jeopardy of the mission. One wonders how the shaky-hand technique of contemporary directors ever came to be considered an aspect of realism in war.

Harris is an intriguing subject he's an "everyman" soldier with deep conviction and an individual with unique demons. He is small of stature, with a firm brow, ghostly complexion, and arresting eyes. Routine banalities, such as shopping in a Walmart, take on a kind of hyper reality as Harris stares transfixed by the release of Call of Duty 4. What could he be thinking? Even if the battle footage is presented in a gimmicky style that dramatizes the experience, the reality of the images free it from sentimentality.

The film speaks intelligently on the disconnect between a soldier on the front lines and the logistics of how a mission is planned. The person fighting is left to carry out his duty on faith alone ("We all believe in the cause"), likening military service to a kind of religious zeal. The film also explores the extent to which Afghani farmers are forced to sacrifice their livelihood for the sake of a foreign freedom they do not understand.





The enemy remains unseen for the duration of the film, underscoring the authenticity of the danger.

A strong sense of irony emerges as the home scenes become tenser than the battle sequences — note a moment when Harris is trying to teach his clearly uncomfortable wife how to aim a handgun. Harris practically forces the weapon into her hand, his voice an innocent drawl but with an expectant tone. He is both endearing and aggressive. Even as his physical injuries heal, Harris's mental instability deteriorates to the point of psychosis. His descent is captured in a way few modern documentaries attempt — not with a parade of talking-head interviews, but as a document of an important experience. \*\*\*\*

dresses. Her ambition to become a fashion designer of the highest artistic caliber paints Eva as a bit of a pariah amid the socialist climate of Havana, Cuba: "Beauty is not a priority here."

Enter Jorge (played with convincing suavity by Juan Carlos García), a well-to-do charmer with a smile that could melt an iceberg. His worldweary aesthetic provides Eva with just the escape she needs, finding justification for her infidelity and reckless behavior in a swish of romantic abandon. Jorge, of course, proves too good to be true (though his deception is never all that sinister), and Eva is left all alone to discover her independence and realize her dreams.

Prakriti Maduro in the lead role provides a nice foil for her male counterparts. She darts through her scenes like a mouse but with conviction, using her frumpy eyes, pouty lips, and head full of Medusa braids. Unfortunately, the performances do not live up to the good looks. The acting is self-conscious, like a well-rehearsed high school play. The movements are too static, the dialogue too forced.

Havana is filmed in all its luscious splendor, but the photography never rises above the tour guide variety. Even so, the colors create a vibrant palette; they pop in a way few directors of urban locales are willing to permit. And while the story entraps itself in the romantic-comedy formula, there are some unfamiliar turns (at least in American cinema) that keep interest alive — most notably a pair of goblin-colored seniors who become business partners with Eva and a friendly haunting who comes to dispense legal advice.

Anonymous - Never before has a "Shakespearean" movie been this lousy. Rafe Spall plays the bard as a bumpkin, virtually illiterate, but the dim actors think he created the great plays scripted in secret by the haughty snob Edward, 17th Earl of Oxford (Rhys Ifans, desperate to hold on to some dignity). This pile from the master defecator of lavish nonsense Roland Emmerich wastes Vanessa Redgrave and her daughter Joely Richardson as Queen Elizabeth (old and young), offers the plays as slices of pickled ham, and makes a moron's case for Oxford as author. The love scenes, crowned by royal fellatio, are hilariously awful. But, hey, swell costumes. 2011. - D.E. • (FASHION VALLEY 18; HORTON PLAZA 14; LA JOL-LA 12: TEMECULA TOWER 10: TOWN SOUARE 14)

**Blackthorn** – A new Western classic, enough to make Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid seem like a sappy prequel. Old Butch (Sam Shepard), now called Blackthorn, hides out in deep Bolivia raising horses and loving a village woman (but still able to ride hard and shoot fast) when a Spanish mining engineer (Eduardo Noriega) leads him into harm's way. The stuff about a pursuing consul (Stephen Rea) is hazy. But the flashbacks are restrained, the Andean landscapes are brilliantly shot by Juan Ruiz Anchía, and Mateo Gil's genre-hip direction of a strong script by Miguel Barros lets Shepard achieve hard, smart, career-topping form. This rugged satisfaction is close to Budd Boetticher's Westerns about tested male rivalry and friendship. 2011. — D.E. ★★★★ (GASLAMP 15)

**Buck** — A great documentary portrait. Buck Brannaman, inspiration and advisor for Robert Redford's *The Horse Whisperer*, seems able to get inside horses on an intuitive, spiritual level, gentling the animals (except one that is dangerously crazy) as he teaches them and their awed owners. A survivor of paternal brutality, Buck is a real hero, without airs, and has a plainspun directness laced with charming humor. Even if you never ride horses, Cindy Meehl's beautifully crafted movie is worth saddling up for, an equine and humane essay in life as cogently honest as Budd Boetticher's classic Westerns. 2011. — D.E.

**Contagion** — A global plague quickly dispatches Gwyneth Paltrow, but Marion Cotillard and Kate Winslet carry on the fight as noble doctors. Lawrence Fishburne is the solemn voice of humane science, like Dennis Haysbert intoning for Allstate Insurance. Steven Soderbergh directed with brisk, methodical care for the big vista and small details, but this disaster movie could use some of the genre's kitsch kicks. It withers, and the bright, clinical imagery makes everyone (including Matt Damon, Elliott Gould, Jude Law, John Hawkes) seem like disposable dots in a petri dish. 2011. — D.E.



In the near-future of an L.A. shot with elegant noir streamlining by Roger Deakins and directed by Kiwi-Brit stylist Andrew Niccol (Gattaca), people live to 25, stop aging, and then must buy, steal, or gamble time to keep living. Justin Timberlake is the cocky but time-short rebel, and doe-eyed Amanda Seyfried the spoiled princess who, Patty Hearst-like, joins his revolt against the pampered plutocrats led by her father. It's a true Hollywood fantasy about a world forever young, yet also a nightmare about our current capitalist malaise. A few slippery details should not spoil your fun. 2011. - D.E.



The charming, sneak-up romance of Gil with a French beauty (Marion Cotillard) adds luster to Darius Khondji's delicious imagery. Not stuffy, the movie name-drops with a blithe bounce. - D.E. ★★★ (LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

Moneyball - A rare sports movie with a brain. Brad Pitt does perhaps his best star acting as Billy Beane, the Oakland Athletics general manager who, sick of being looted of talent by big-money teams like the Yankees, opted for a "sabermetrics" approach using computers and the advice of a smart, chubby nerd (Jonah Hill, very good as this composite figure). The script went through much overhaul (Robin Wright's tiny role may be a symptom of that), and Steven Soderbergh left as director, but Bennett Miller came in as more than a relief hitter. #### LEAD STORY

— Richard Handl, 31, was arrested in southern Sweden in July after a raid on his home. He had been trying for months to set up a nuclear reactor in his kitchen but became alarmed when a brew of americium, tritium, and beryllium created a nuclear meltdown on his stove. Only then, he said, did it occur to him to ask the country's radiation authority if what he was doing was legal, and the subsequent police raid answered that question. No dangerous radiation level was detected, but Handl still faces fines and a maximum two-year prison sentence for unauthorized possession of nuclear materials.

#### **Leading Economic Indicators**

- Augustin James Evangelista is only four years old, but he has certain financial needs - which amount to about \$46,000 a month, according to the child-support request filed by his mother, "supermodel" Linda Evangelista. A Wall Street Journal reporter concluded that the figure is about right for rich kids in New York City, what with needing a driver, designer clothes, aroundthe-clock nannies and various personalized lessons. And soon, according to a consultant-tothe-rich, Augustin James will become even more expensive, as he graduates from his exclusive preschool and enters his exclusive kindergarten. - The highest-paid state-government employee in budget-strapped California in 2010 was among the least productive workers in the system, according to a Los Angeles Times investigation reported in July. Jeffrey Rohlfing is on the payroll as a surgeon in the state prison system (base pay: \$235,740), but he has been barred from treating inmates for the past six years because supervisors believe him to be incompetent. Last year, Dr. Rohlfing earned an additional \$541,000 in back pay after he successfully appealed his firing to the state's personnel board. Currently, Dr. Rohlfing is assigned recordskeeping duties.

#### The Entrepreneurial Society

— The fashion designer Chandrashekar Chawan recently created gold-plated, diamond-studded contact lenses that make eyes "sparkle" (not always a good thing, admitted Chawan, citing reviews calling the look "cringeworthy" and "demonic"). According to an MSNBC report, the "bling" part never actually touches the cornea.

- Among the trendiest avant-garde beauty treatments are facial applications made from snail mucus, according to a July report by London's *Daily Mail*. South Korean glamour consultants were the first to use mollusk extract's generous moisturizing properties, though a dermatologist warned (on NBC's *Today* show) that no "controlled" studies have yet demonstrated snail-goo superiority.

#### No, Thanks!

- Colorado inmate Daniel Self filed a federal lawsuit in July against the Sterling Correctional Facility because prison personnel saved his life. They revived him after he had stopped breathing from an attack of sleep apnea, but he contends he had previously demanded to officials that he never be resuscitated, preferring to die rather serve out his life sentence.

— Terry Barth complained to hospital officials that he was "kidnapped" by paramedics and thus cannot be liable for the \$40,000 he has been billed by Enloe Medical Center in Chico, Calif., where he was brought by ambulance following a motorcycle crash in August 2010. Barth said he had insisted at the scene that paramedics not take him to a hospital because he had no medical insurance. Paramedics are legally required to take anyone with a serious head injury.

#### **Medical Marvel**

— The first published instance of a woman's nipple appearing on the sole of her foot was noted in a 2006 report in the journal *Dermatology* and reprised in a series of U.S. and British press reports in July 2011. The reporting physicians, led by Dr. Delio Marques Conde, acknowledged that out-of-place breast tissue, while extremely rare, has shown up before on the back, shoulder, face, and thigh. The foot nipple was "well-formed," with areola and sebaceous glands.
