



Kehoe's China adventure Democratic state senator Christine Kehoe, barred by

term limits from running again for her seat, has continued to collect contributions for her socalled officeholder account, a means that state law sanctions to tap special interests for cash to be used for personal political causes. The law is broad enough to permit expenditures on travel, lodging, and meals,

which Kehoe and many other legislators take major advantage of. Last October, for instance, for a California Air

Resources Board meeting, the senator from San Diego hosted a party of nine, including herself, for a \$230 luncheon at the Acqua restaurant inside the Hilton San Diego Resort and Spa. The officeholder fund plunked down \$281 for 11 meals at Sacramento's Buckhorn Grill for an Appropriations Committee staff meeting. Then there was a \$230 tab at Frank Fat's restaurant, also in Sacramento, for three diners at a meeting with a member of the California Energy Commission. Back in San Diego, it was \$245 at Seaport Village's Harbor House for a holiday staff luncheon for eight. In September, San Diego's Red Door played host to a \$139 staff farewell lunch for seven. And Kehoe apparently didn't have weight-watching in

mind when she ordered \$584 worth of merchandise from See's Candies for office use.

But the fund's largest expenditures were made for a two-week "cultural exchange trip" Kehoe took from San Diego to Beijing, China,

in the first half of November, according to the report. Airfare on United was \$5955.20, with a leg to Vietnam's Ho Chi Minh City costing \$606.90 on China Southern Airlines. But the bulk of that fare appears to have been credited back by the airline, and the officeholder account paid \$337.07 for medical treatment Kehoe received on November 5 at Xie He Hospital in Beijing. (According to the filing, the committee is seeking reimbursement from health insurance.)

In a phone interview last week, Myrna Zambrano, Kehoe's district director, confirmed that the senator had become ill during the trip, but said that she had since recovered. Zambrano said she would ask Kehoe's permission to disclose further details but didn't call back.

Get out of jail free cards San

Diego County sheriff **Bill Gore** is looking for a few good legal researchers to help the denizens of his jails throw off their chains. "The inmates' right to conduct legal research has been determined to be within their constitutional right to access the courts,"


> says a January 25 bid request on the County's procurement website. "The County of San Diego Sheriff's Department has determined the inmates' use of legal research ser-

vices offsite, or outside of a detention facility, is preferred for security reasons and for cost effectiveness. Therefore, the Sheriff intends to award a contract with an initial term

from the date of the award through June 30, 2013, and three option terms of one year each." Under the plan, the inmates in stir will submit written research requests, which will then be followed up on by attorneys on the outside.

"Approximately 95,000 inmates are processed through the Sheriff's seven detention facilities each year," the request continues. "The average daily population of inmates is approximately 4700 housed in the facilities that include: the East Mesa Detention Facility, the Facility 8, the George Bailey Detention Facility, the Las Colinas Women's Detention Facility, the South Bay Detention Facility, the San Diego Central Jail and the Vista Detention Facility.

Fed Probes May Help American Engineers

merican computer professionals who complain that they lose jobs or get lower pay because of imported tech workers may

have reason to smile. Government regulators are cracking down on alleged fraud in worker visa programs.

But some heavyweight companies, such as San Diego's Qualcomm, are lobbying hard to bring in even more foreign engineers. Smaller local software companies want more offshore techies, too.


On January 25, Indiabased Infosys, a so-called body shop, or placement firm that sends talent to American companies, revealed that it and some of its employees are targets of a Texas criminal investigation into fraud and abuse of United States visa laws. The State Department, Homeland Security, Department of Justice, and Internal Revenue Service are investigating Infosys practices.

Importation of tech and other workers with a bachelor's degree is normally accomplished through the H-1B visa program, by which foreigners can take jobs of up to six years with American corporations. America brings in 65,000 such workers a year, plus another 20,000 with advanced degrees. In addition, foreign workers take jobs with nonprofit organizations, and under the L-1 program, companies bring in employees already working in their overseas subsidiaries.

Critics complain that the H-1B engineers (heav-

ily from India and greatly under age 30) are paid less than their United States counterparts, thus depriving Americans of jobs and depressing the general technology wage the workers' pay in their Indian bank accounts and gave them bank debit cards to cover living expenses in the United States. The workers' names weren't on the books, and state and federal withholding taxes were not paid.

The whistle-blower's Alabama lawyer shared his information with federal government investigators, and in May of last year Infosys reported that its records were being subpoenaed. Then, on January 25, the company revealed the depth and breadth of the investigation and said it could adversely affect

level. Under United States law, this is not supposed to happen, but studies have shown that it does.

Infosys was first sued in a whistle-blower civil suit in Alabama. An employee said he suffered retaliation after complaining that Infosys engaged in largescale visa and tax fraud. In particular, he charged, Infosys got around the H-1B limitations by using the B-1 visa program. B-1 visas are only for nonproductive purposes, such as attending a convention; people with B-1 visas cannot receive wages from American employers. The whistle-blower charged that Infosys deposited

Infosvs business.

The critics hope such adverse effects will spread throughout the H-1B program. The Infosys investigation "has put a chill in the industry," says Donna Conroy, director of Chicago-based Bright Future Jobs, which represents American workers pushing for outsourcing reform. "The regulatory pressure has been beefed up. Companies are talking about hiring Americans again."

Don Tennant, columnist for IT Business Edge, says that the civil and criminal Infosys cases, along with some other positive developments, are indus-

Good Advice? Don't Pay Homeowners

n 2009, a few downtown residents discovered that they, along with over 2600 other downtown property owners, had been

overcharged by the property and business improvement district in which they lived. The assessment district, also known as the Clean and Safe Program, provides enhanced city services such as sidewalk cleaning,

tree trimming, and security patrols for 5300 parcels in East Village, Gaslamp, Core Columbia, and the Cortez and Marina districts.


Some residents had overpaid only \$32, while others

had unknowingly shelled out \$1500 extra. In all, the error was estimated to total more than \$269,000. More than two and a half years later, the residents have not received refund checks, despite repeated promises from the City.

As residents continue to wait, the Downtown San Diego Partnership, the

that administers the improvement district, has been writing other checks.

The job entailed reviewing contracts, presenting strategies on how to raise more funds, and renewing the "special benefit district for the maximum term available, if not in perpetuity," according to the contract.

Li Mandri's paycheck is in addition to the \$1.6 million that the district budgeted for salaries and wages in fiscal year 2012.

The discovery that the district was paying a \$10,000 monthly consultant fee, combined with its refusal to refund the overassessments, has left many residents upset and frustrated.

"I am an owner in the Cortez District and as such try to keep abreast of the monies spent and services rendered in this area Clean and Safe," wrote one Cortez Hill resident who wished to remain anonymous.

"I was appalled to discover Mr. Li Mandri has been hired as a consultant by this group and he is receiving \$10,000 per month. It does make one wonder in what direction this organization is headed. It seems to be growing in leaps and bounds, not in the field forces but in the management group. I'd venture to say this is yet another example of non-transparency."

Li Mandri, whose office is on West Ivy at Columbia Street, specializes in assessment districts. His for-profit company, New City America, has formed 61 districts across the country.

His business practices, however, have come under fire in recent years. Between 2005 and 2007, a joint investigation by the FBI and San Diego Police Department looked into conflict-of-interest allegations involving a business improvement district in North Bay that Li Mandri set up for the City of San Diego and ran for a time as executive director; later, the district awarded Li Mandri's company contracts. (The investigators submitted their report to the district attorney, requesting that Li Mandri and others be charged with violations

Chargers Bolted to the Q?

Goodell Shuts Door on NFL Teams Moving

Mission Valley — The big controversy over the Chargers moving to Los Angeles would appear to be over. National Football League commissioner Roger Goodell said on TV last night (Thursday, February 2) that the league "doesn't want to move any of our teams."

For years, the Chargers have been going down two tracks: the team preferred L.A. but continued to seek out opportunities (massive taxpayer subsidies) in San Diego, knowing that a move might be blocked by team owners.

Goodell's statement probably is rooted in the league's fear of antitrust lawsuits, says San Diego attorney Mike Aguirre. With new redevelopment money probably dead, the league against team relocation, and San Diego ailing financially, the Chargers should be staying at Qualcomm Stadium, where the ownership is making a bundle of money.

Signage Ban Snapped

Snapdragon Deal Left Key Official in the Dark

San Diego — Mayor Jerry Sanders has finally released documents responding to the California public records act request we made on December 12 of last year regarding his "Snapdragon Stadium" promotional name-change gambit.

As we were first to report last month, a December 7 memo from city attorney Jan Goldsmith held that the promotion — which sources say was done by Sanders as a favor to his longtime political backers at Qualcomm, Inc., including founder Irwin Jacobs — violated city law.

The documents released by Sanders show that the name-change plans were in

motion at least as early as October 28 of last year. By November 18, a problem had cropped up regarding the legality of the project, prompting an email from the city's stadium manager, Mike McSweeney, to chief operating officer Jay Goldstone, a top Sanders aide.

As Goldsmith's legal opinion would eventually point out, plans to put giant Snagdragon signs around the outside of the stadium would violate the city's so-called off-premise sign ban, which prohibits signage touting products that are not sold where the signs are located.

But McSweeney told Goldstone he had come up with an answer and that the city's code enforcement staff had signed off on it: "Essentially, if game attendees can download the app from their smartphones in the stadium, the product is sold within the stadium, making it compliant with the ordinance."

On December 16 came an email from Mary Lewis, the city's chief financial officer, raising questions about the value of the Snapdragon deal to the city.

"Is the City being compensated for promoting a specific Qualcomm product?" Lewis wrote. "This kind of product exposure is worth a considerable amount of money and was this part of the negotiation?"

On the morning of December 19, McSweeney emailed Patrick Connors, president of San Diego's Gravitate Sports Marketing, to say that he had been given approval to sign an agreement with Qualcomm.

The document, released by Sanders's office to us last month, required Qualcomm to pay the city a \$1000 promotional fee.





n 2011 I lost my kick-ass condo and went on antianxiety meds that — when combined with stress, financial troubles, moving house, and excessive drinking and dining out — left me two sizes larger. STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

Hey Matt:

There has been a question bugging me since I worked at the O.B. Pier bait shop years ago. Is there a breed of fish called a sardine, or are they called that only after they are prepared? Any help?

— GA from SD

This isn't a can of sardines, it's a can of worms. Wasn't there something besides sardines to think about when you worked at the bait shop? Anyway, there definitely is a kind of live, swimming-around fish called a sardine. Better yet, there are many kinds of live, swimming-around fish called sardines. But there are things that we don't call sardines but are found in cans labeled "sardines."

Science guys classify what ordinary folk call sardines into a family called Clupeidae, with brothers and sisters: herrings, sprat, menhaden, and shad. The next step down the classification chart is a fish's genus, separating the Clupeidae into smaller groups based on physical characteristics and habitat. About 17 genera of fish called sardines. Next step, with very specific characteristics, is the fish's species. Dozens and dozens of "sardine" species from warm, cold, fresh, brackish, or marine waters around the world: Atlantic sardine, India-oil sardine, perforated-scale sardine, Reader sardine — really. From St. Lucia. Not kidding. So there's your free-range sardines.

Sardines with their heads chopped off are a slightly different matter. The FDA permits a can labeled "sardines" to actually be a can of fish of the genera that include sprats, brislings, and small herrings, all of them being so closely related. So there's your argument for a sardine not being a sardine until it's put in a can. There are actually two internet sources that make your argument, too, one a supposed high-toned chef and the other some guy who writes for the Boston Globe as "Dr. Knowledge." Both claim sardines aren't sardines until they're in a can. Sure, occasionally a herring is a herring until it's put in a can labeled "sardines," but that's the exception. Worldwide, Sardina pilchardus is considered the "true" sardine; that's a fish the Brits call a pilchard, we call a sardine. Following United Nations guidelines, any fish sold as a sardine that is not a pilchard-type has to bear a clarification of exactly what species of sardine it is. Of course, this is much ado about a foodstuff nobody likes anyway.

Heavy lifting? Hah! Lightweight stuff, mostly because we've already answered this. No textbooks, no scientific papers, no extended research. We just asked a blind person. Your education environment has hijacked your logic; you've made the easy unnecessarily complicated. Just ask a blind person. If you'd done as we did, you'd learn that the blind dream exactly the way we do, experiencing their dreaming world in the same way they experience their waking world: sound, touch, smell, hearing. Our dreaming blind person had actually dreamed of driving a car, so the dreams of the blind are just as goofy as ours sometimes are.

Matthew Alice: What does the M in M-16 rifle stand for? — MFS, UCLA

Remember we're dealing here with the U.S. military, a no-frills, no-imagination outfit that runs on codes and letters and numbers and dashes and slashes and dots. If you were hoping for something romantic or even mean and nasty, you're out of luck. The M in M-16 stands for "Model." Model 16 semi-auto rifle. According to the Springfield (MA) Armory National Park, the largest repository of historical U.S. military weapons in the world, the M designation for rifles goes back to before 1800. In 1946 the Armorlite company designed what they called the AR-15 rifle. The U.S. tried it out in the Air Force and Army and eventually bought the design from Armorlite. They shifted the name from AR-15 to the military standard, and the M-16 began replacing older models in soldiers' hands.





Poway Town Hall Meeting on Teen Drug Abuse Yields Plan for Parental Instruction on Responsible Drug Use

"The family that tokes together, jokes together."

NO LONGER KIDDING OURSELVES, POWAY — Two weeks ago, the Poway Intentional Leadership League (PILL) held a community-wide meeting to address the surprisingly pervasive problem of teen drug abuse in this affluent, well-mannered suburb.

The meeting drew over 300 people from all walks of community life — parents, teachers, law enforcement officials, and even some students and their dealers. And while the debate was intense and occasionally raucous, it seems to have borne fruit: the PILL Plan for Observation and Practice (PILL POP). Essentially, the plan calls on Poway's parents to use recreational drugs with their children, instead of hiding out in the den or the master suite bathroom.

"It's not like we're not using these drugs already," explains PILL POP proponent Carl Dawson, a longtime Poway pothead and father of three. "Of course we are. But what makes us different from the tweaker living in his own filth in a dumpster behind the Circle K is the fact that we know the appropriate time to party and how much partying we can handle while still

maintaining a responsible image. How are our children ever going to learn these things unless we teach them? Through trial and error? Advice from peers? Movies and television? I think it's pretty clear that we need to get involved with our kids' highs."

Critics warn that the plan does not do enough to stress the illegal nature of recreational drug use, but Dawson dismisses that as pie-in-the-sky distraction from the real issues. "I cannot stress it enough — parents are their children's primary educators in the behavioral realm. It is essential that parents model responsible consumption when it comes to Oxycontin, marijuana, or other controlled substances. Otherwise, we are just going to see more deaths from overdoses, more kids smoking themselves right out of polite upper-middle-class society."

Besides just smoking out with your kids, Dawson suggests "making it an educational experience. Is your child interested in agriculture? Teach them about hybridization and sustainable growth by growing your favorite strain of weed with them. Does your daughter like chemistry? Try cooking up some meth together. And snagging a

prescription for weapons-grade Oxycontin from your primary health care provider can be the occasion for a discussion of medical ethics and the health care crisis in general. Research has shown that these kinds of shared experiences are crucial to the well-being of your child. Plus, drugs are amazing."

"It's time to take parental drug use out of the closet," concludes Dawson. "Unless, of course, that's where the grow lamps are. And who knows? For some kids, the experience of getting high with their parents might be enough to turn them off illegal drugs forever."







have Dewey Not-His-Real-Name Pienkey on the phone. He's a Nevada friend from olden days. Third generation, born and raised in Searchlight, a town of 550, an hour's drive south of Vegas, known for the El Rey Bordello and senate majority leader Harry Reid.

The early Mirage line had New England favored by 3½ points. That line lasted from 1:30 p.m. all the way to 2:30 p.m. on January 23, then moved down to 3 points and there it sat. Dewey wanted to bet the Giants but wanted another ½ point, so he chased 3½ points for the next 13 days. Seven months will pass before we watch another surgeon dig into a Rob Gronkowski ankle and root around for bone fragments or watch a Joe Theismann turn his foot backward and try to tap dance on AstroTurf. Seven months is enough time to have a world economic meltdown, enough time for a viviparous shark to become impregnated and give birth to a little maneater, enough time for a field of watermelons to grow and rot, enough time for...it's a long, long time, Bucko.

I say, "Dewey, what are you going to do, start talking to your wife and kids?"

"Looks like," Dewey says. Long pause. "Will they want to have dinner at the dining room table? How long does that take?" Pause. "No, I'm kidding. Great wife, great kids.... It's just that...they're always around. Just kidding."

"I see a reeducation camp in your future." Dewey mumbles, "Great wife. Great kids." "Buck up, lad. March Madness is coming."

"Yeah, goes three weeks," Dewey says. "Sure, I'll watch some. Why not? Who cares? Baseball begins its endless, dreary slo-mo in April. Unwatchable dreck. There is the NFL draft. 





La Jolla Country Day Evens Score with Francis Parker

La Jolla — After an uneven start to Coastal League play, La Jolla Country Day is charging back into contention. Friday night (January 3) at home, the Torreys used defense to dominate Francis Parker 53-35 in a win that exacted revenge and moved them squarely into the league title picture.

"We were confident, and we came out and played lights out," said La Jolla Country Day senior guard Nick Schlossberg. "The mindset of this game was to get them back like they got us, and that's what we did tonight."

La Jolla Country Day (14-6, 4-2 Coastal) scored the first eight points of the game and led 17-7 after the first quarter. The Torreys held Francis Parker (11-11, 4-2) to four points in the second quarter to open up a convincing 28-11 lead by halftime.

"We just wanted to play as a team — not as five individuals but just come together — and we really did that this week, especially in practice," Schlossberg said.

Francis Parker opened the second half with a

9-2 run but couldn't get closer than double digits as La Jolla Country Day held an 18-point lead after the third quarter. The Torreys led by 24 points in the fourth quarter and comfortably avenged a 22-point loss to the Lancers on January 13.

"This is the toughest part of our schedule. and [we knew] if we beat [Francis Parker] we'd be on a steady pace to win league and go on to CIF," Schlossberg said. "We're really excited about this win."

Schlossberg scored 14 points to lead La Jolla Country Day — including three three-pointers and was one of three Torreys in double figures. Off the bench, 6-foot-8 sophomore center Jordan Poland finished with 14 points for the Torreys and presented problems for Francis Parker on both ends of the floor.

"We have a new big guy this year and he helps us out as a defensive and offensive presence," Schlossberg said of Poland. "We put in a new play for the big man, and every time he's open we try to get him the ball and let him do

La Jolla Country Day came out of its biggest week of the season with wins over Army-Navy and Francis Parker. As a result, the Torreys are right in the mix for a league title.

"I think we can win this thing," Schlossberg said. "If we win out, we win the league, and that's our mindset."

LEAD STORY

— Don Aslett, 76, recently opened the Museum of Clean in Pocatello, Idaho, as the culmination of a lifelong devotion to tidying up. Highlights are several hundred pre-electric vacuum cleaners plus interactive exhibits to encourage kids to clean their rooms. Aslett told London's *Daily Mail* in December that people who don't understand his dedication must never have experienced the satisfaction of making a toilet bowl sparkle.

Government in Action!

— Predator drones are an important weapon against terrorists in Afghanistan, Yemen, and other countries, but in June, an unarmed predator was employed stateside to help catch cattle rustlers. The Department of Homeland Security owns eight predators for surveillance and occasionally assists local law enforcement. The cattle rustlers had been arrested, then jumped bail and holed up on their vast ranch near Lakota, N.D., but the predator spotted their exact location on the property, leading to a raid that ended without bloodshed.

— India's legendarily plodding government bureaucracy had long stymied a snake charmer named Hakkul (a villager in Uttar Pradesh state) who had sought a snake-conservation permit, which had been authorized at one level but delayed locally. In November, finally exasperated, Hakkul walked into the land revenue office in the town of Harraiya with several sacks of snakes (including cobras) and turned them loose, sending clerks and visitors climbing furniture or fleeing. Recent news accounts report that "almost all" of the snakes had been rounded up.

— A December news release from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control warned of the dangers of *Campylobacter jejuni* bacteria infections on a sheep ranch, but apparently only among workers who used an old-style (19th Century) method of castrating the animals. CDC strongly urged that workers stop biting off the sheep's genitals and instead use modern tools.

Chutzpah!

— Convicted serial rapist Steven Phillips was exonerated in 2008, one of a continuing string of wrongly convicted Dallas-area "criminals" proved innocent by DNA testing, and under a formula by state law, he was awarded about \$4 million, tax-free, for his 25 years behind bars. Recently, Phillips's ex-wife filed a petition in court demanding a portion — even though the couple had been divorced for the last 17 years of his incarceration, and the ex-wife had remarried and had a child. (The ex-wife claims it was Phillips who originated the divorce and that she had given up on him only because he had revealed a "disgusting" history as a "peeping tom" and flasher.)

Felicitous Discoveries

— Dan D'Amato, 45, partying in an Orlando, Fla., motel room in December, was accidentally shot by a stranger who was having a dispute with another partygoer. Later, as his wounded hip was being treated at a hospital, doctors discovered and removed two "huge" tumors in D'Amato's abdomen that had so far gone unnoticed. The tumors were not cancerous but had they not been found, they would soon have disabled him.

— At a home in Taylorsville, Utah, in December,

a housemate who was pursuing a mouse in the kitchen accidentally shot another housemate. As police investigated, they discovered a 13-year-old girl hiding in a closet. A third housemate, Paul Kunzler, 28, was then arrested and charged with carrying on a months-long sexual relationship with her.

Police Report

— John Whittle, 52, was charged in December with robbing a Wells Fargo Bank in Port Richey, Fla. According to police, Whittle ordered a beer at the Hayloft Bar shortly after 1 p.m., then excused himself, and a few minutes later, returned to finish his beer. In the interim, police said later, Whittle had walked down the street to the bank and robbed it.

— In December, Russell Mace, 55, was caught soon after robbing a Union Savings Bank branch in New Milford, Conn. A bank employee had spotted Mace acting "suspicious" in the parking lot, and indeed, he said, Mace entered, robbed the bank of about \$3000, and fled to a waiting car. Police, however, identified the car, which they had noted from Mace's recent arrest for shoplifting. (The "suspicious" behavior the bank employee had noticed, he told police, was Mace, pants down, defecating, in plain view among parked cars.)

Update

— Not all states have anti-bestiality laws, and Peter Bower's ongoing case in Ohio exemplifies prosecutors' frustration. There was evidence that Bower had had sex with a dog ("Maggie") and had written her "love" letters, and police arrested him in June. Prosecutors were willing to settle

the case in November for minimal punishment because the only law Bower could have been charged under is "animal cruelty," and they explained that they might have had trouble showing harm to the apparently adored dog. (At the time of Bower's arrest, a search had uncovered human-animal pornography and a life-sized inflatable sheep.)

Clichés Come to Life

— A 28-year-old man in New York City quietly excused himself the morning after his wedding in November (at a hotel following an elaborate reception), took a taxi to a Harlem River overlook, and jumped to his death. According to a relative, the man's suicide note mentioned that he "couldn't take it anymore."

Undignified Deaths

- A $\overline{77}$ -year-old man was killed by a sheriff's deputy in December while standing beside his own engraved tombstone in a Gardnerville, Nev., cemetery. The victim was holding a shotgun and was distraught over the death of his wife.

—A 20-year-old man died of an apparent cocaine overdose in North Charleston, S.C., in December as a result of trying to help his older brother. The pair had been arrested and placed in a police cruiser when the older brother convinced the younger one to swallow the ounce of cocaine the older man was carrying. (According to a police report, the cocaine had been stored in the older man's "backside.")



[meals ready to eat] for all of us." Shark was the only one of us with military service.

When the Princess got home, I switched gears

For the next half hour, we tried in vain to penetrate the green wall, finding no passage short of a belly crawl into the labyrinth. We retreated back to the trail. We were breathing deeply from our failed efforts, our camouflage outfits embedded





with twigs and leaves.

I apologized for the energy and time lost. "I could have sworn we came out just before a creek last time.'

"We'll never get through that mess," Bull said. "Let's keep going on the trail."

A few minutes later, we felt the cooler, moist air of another brook ahead. We crossed the water and ascended the left bank. The brush here was patchy, with gaps between clumps. Shark motioned with militarystyle hand signals that he'd found the deer skull; we knew it was the same one by a puncture wound below its right eye, probably a cougar kill.

In a panic, he fumbled to open it and kill the siren's switch.

"Damn," he said sheepishly. "Sorry about that, guys. I didn't know the megaphone was on."

Hide and seek was over. If the pot farmers hadn't known where we were, they did now. Would they rush us, thinking we were the cops?

A dozen squawking birds bolted from the tangled woods, their highpitched calls announcing a world of chaos below. The birds lifted in frantic flight in a steady progression away from us. More scrub jays and woodpeckers pealed off, one by one, signaling with their alarm calls that whatever or

whoever was in the forest was also heading away. Bull's megaphone faux pas had worked in our favor.

In the distance we heard a reverberated staccato cadence: wap wap wap. "That's the chopper!" Bull said.

Into the cell phone I said, "Steve, you're to the south of us." A minute later, he was to the east. He couldn't see us. Several more passes, several more phone calls. Then he spotted Shark, who had moved into a slight clearing, giving the chopper pilot military arm signals to land. The helicopter came down on the other side of a nearby ridge.

from the tall grass.

He introduced himself to our camouflaged band, checking us out with the same I-guessed-you-wrong look on his face that we had on ours. He'd probably expected three candy-ass hikers in DayGlo, with trendy gear from REI. Instead, he greeted a military-style, camouflage-dressed, wannabe tactical team.

Single file, we led Agent Reed to the pot garden's entrance. He took the point with his sidearm unbuckled. Shark, ever on alert, took up the rear, making sure that no one followed us.

We walked along well-traveled, terraced paths lined with pungent pot plants without finding the garden's end. "Wow! This is huge!" said Reed. Thousands of five- to seven-foot-tall marijuana plants, with bud tips as fat around as Louisville Sluggers, blended in with the native mountain lilacs.

Steve said, "I can't believe we didn't spot this before. You can tell this farm has been here for years."

We passed several campsites filled with heaps of trash. In one, the growers' breakfast was still cooking via a small fire under a flat rock that served as a griddle for tortillas and beans. All the bags of food stores contained Mexican cui-

sine: bottles of Tapatio hot sauce, cans of refried beans, packages of corn tortillas, and an assortment of chilies.

before. Without hesitation he said, "I'm the third generation of law enforcement in my family. Not one of my relatives has ever gone bad, and I'm not going to ruin that legacy."

The pungent odor was giving me a throbbing headache. I left the garden and ate lunch with Shark on the buckwheat hillside. We were finishing our hot MREs just as Bull led two green-uniformed men out of the woods. One was from the Bureau of Land Management Narcotics Task Force, the other from Army Reserve Drug Enforcement. Both men were armed.

Back in the hidden pot plantation, we spread out to probe the size of the field. We followed the extensive system of irrigation hose. In the approximate middle was the growers' trash-strewn camp, years' worth of

human refuse. Shark found a walkie-talkie that worked and stashed it in his side pocket. A pile of resin-soaked clothing stood two feet high; the green-colored shirts and pants were too sticky to wear anymore, so they'd been discarded. Dozens of garbage bags —

stuffed, ripped, and overflowing — littered the forest. I remembered an old television commercial that had showed a Native American crying when he saw his once-unspoiled environment trashed. This scene would have sent him on the warpath.

Along another trail,

the growers had cut down four trees. Fifteen-foot-long logs formed a crude frame three feet off the ground. This frame had been lashed to trees, then woven together with sturdy rope, forming a cargo net-like platform that held several sleeping bags off the cold ground. The frame was worn smooth from years of use.

A long rope stretched between two trees, and on this rope hung dozens of drying, upside-down, bud clusters. Another rope held strips of freshly killed deer meat — no hunting permit required here. Cured by the sun's rays, the deer's translucent flesh had a pink glow, similar to cherry taffy. Bambi had been blasted by a long gun; its plastic sheath lay on the ground, along with an open box of 12-gauge

double-ought buckshot shells.

Farther along another

trail, an irrigation tube had been strung over a tree branch. An off/on irrigation valve controlled water flow. The crotch of the tree held bars of soap and bottles of shampoo, and a film of sudsy iridescent residue colored the earth.

Open bags of fertilizer and stashes of chemical growing supplements had been strewn all over the vast cannabis garden. Half a mile of black irri-

gation tubing and thinner feeder lines watered thousands of marijuana plants. At the lower end of the grow, alongside the creek, we found a handdug 15 x 15 foot pit. About six feet deep, it was half filled with rotting garbage and decomposing trash. There was no plastic, nonpermeable liner to block the rancid leach.

Back at Steve's throne, we six huddled up.


"Just once, I wish I could catch the bastards," Steve fumed. "Make them clean up this mess."



"They know that the first time they kill one of us, we'll come down on them hard. They don't want to go there. Right now, it's a serious game of cat and mouse. They grow their gardens, and we bust them. Sometimes they win, and sometimes they lose. This time they lost big. This pot field was planted on a north-facing slope. The sun doesn't shimmer off the plants like it normally does, so we didn't see it from the air. These little pricks were smart. This is one of the best grows I've ever seen. And they've used this field for years."

Steve and his team got down to business. Drawing machetes from their packs, they started to cut down the plants. Shark, Bull, and I decided to go up the creek bed and scout for more grows.

"Should one of us go with them?" the Bureau of Land Management guy asked Steve.

"Naw, they're okay." Steve hacked at an inchand-a-half-thick fibrous

I hope so, I thought.

We located the source of the irrigation, main lines immersed a hundred yards upstream. Then we continued on, hiking for an hour in thick brush. Briars ripped at our gaiters. Limbs slapped my face, raising welts. I hope we get a reward for all this effort, I thought. I bellycrawled into a promising spot, but there was nothing. After another hour, with no sign of pot or trash, we headed back.

At the garden, the scene had changed drastically. Thousands of pot plants had been cut down

and stacked in neat piles throughout the grow. The three men looked like sugarcane-cutters harvesting a crop, machetes swinging high before slashing a stalk.

"Can we help?" we asked.

"Sure," Steve said, his shirt soaked with perspiration. "But be sure to cut the plants below the lowest leaf, or it will grow back."

We found pruning saws at one of the growers' camps and pitched in.

"Keep track of how many you cut," instructed the guy from the Army Reserve.

The task of felling the crop was hard, as real work always is. The THC resin got on everything; my gloves, pants, shirt, and saw soon were sticky from the clear tar. At





Several days later, the big Cuyamaca drug bust burst to the top of the local news. The story showed choppers hauling out bulging cargo nets of pot plants. Several officers stood around a cleanshaven Steve Reed, who was touting the big haul to the media which had gathered to glean the details.

"Hey, honey, we're on!" I shouted, proud that Bull, Shark, and I had initiated this bust. Steve briefly mentioned something about how "hikers found pot," but beyond that it was his bust. Oh well, I thought, surely the reward will be coming. A couple hundred bucks, a confiscated doper's car, something.

We hashed and rehashed the adventure in detail for a few days, working ourselves into a frenzy of what-ifs.

Shark said, "Steve won't forget us, bro! It says on the Drug Enforcement website that there's rewards. Frick! Bro bro. Where there's one [grow], there's two, and where there's two, there's three!"

"Yeah, let's get stompin'!" Bull said. "I've got a topo map of the whole park. Where the water is, the dope is." Visions of big booty from

the pot-park detectives danced in our heads.



crossed under the trail.

"No water, no pot," I said, dejected that we'd come so far for nothing.

Bull stomped down the dry creek bed, crashing and then disappearing into a chaotic network of brambles.

"Bingo!" he shouted.
"We got water!"

The faint flow increased as we followed the stream. With the growers' confiscated walkie-talkie, we listened in on a voiceless communication code of clicks and clacks, unable to decipher the code. With our own walkie-talkies, we communicated in whispers. After 50 yards, we had a running creek. At 200 yards, Shark keyed his mic with our agreed-upon code word, "Bingo!" He was looking at a small segment of black irrigation

inch-diameter hose into a thick maze of lilac and burnt pines, tracking it under fallen trees, through briar patches, and into seemingly impenetrable thickets. We surged past each other in spurts, eager to find a new field, each man wanting to be the first one there. Twenty minutes of effort paid off as we stumbled exhausted into a zone that was underbrushfree. We huddled together to listen. Not hearing anyone, we began to survey a sapling forest that had been cleared by human hands.

We warily explored the acre-plus prepped zone and came to the conclusion that this was a fallow field waiting to be planted at a later date. It was nearly void of trash, a sure sign that no growers were around. Only a few hundred plastic starter cups in an open clearing and some green-handled shovels gave away the area's intended purpose.

After thoroughly checking the immediate vicinity, we pushed farther down the ever-widening valley. We named it "la Drang Valley" and the elusive Mexican growers we called "Charlie." Just like in the Vietnam War, these enemy combatants were stealthy and bush-savvy. Signs of Charlie's presence were everywhere — burntup hoses from previous grows, old rusty shovels, empty food cans.

Long shadows grew even longer across the gorge as ebony fingers reached out from carbonized tree trunks. We were tired and knew that to retrace our steps uphill would be exhausting and going. Three wrinkled \$20 bills at the Barona Casino couldn't be more


spent than we were. We had poked and prodded almost every thicket in the valley. Charlie was crafty and we were tired.




used to smoke the abundant buds.

open fertilizer bags scattered about with no regard for the running stream. Charlie was not a member of the Sierra Club.

We took what little spoils and trinkets we wanted, a flashlight, a folded military shovel, a battery charger, a small pick — trophies of war. Charlie was being outmaneuvered in la Drang Valley. And seeing what little regard he had for one of San Diego's premier parks, he had to go.

Over the next month, we repeatedly scoured Cuyamaca state park, arriving early and leaving past dark. We made a dozen missions in total, all focused on finding Charlie's hidden operations. Using our ever-accumulating intel on the enemy, we tracked his special shoe prints in the trail dust. The dotted sole pattern was between a size six and a size eight. Then the prints abruptly ended next to an ever-so-faint track that led into the brush. Hunting animals is easy; hunting humans is hard. The slightest whisper of a potential slip trail beckoned now. Rested and newly curious, I followed it back into the thickets. Was it just a deer trail? I wondered. 

assemblywoman Toni Atkins on December 22. Meanwhile Orange County's Irvine Company, owned by Republican billionaire Donald Bren, stepson of the late Oscar-winning movie star Claire Trevor, gave big to two San Diego business causes last year, according to his recently filed major donor statement. The firm, which owns substantial real estate in the county, including several downtown office towers, gave \$25,000 to the San Diego Lodging Industry Political Action Committee and \$5000 on October 17 to the San Diego Jobs PAC.

try game-changers. The biggest tech story of this year will be "the implosion of the H-1B visacentric business model" of major corporations, he proclaims in his column. "Company after company [will be] forced to halt... abuse of the visa system for fear of suffering the consequences that Infosys will have suffered."

Professor Norm Matloff of the University of California Davis, who has written extensively on the H-1B program, points out that the original purpose was to bring in "the best and the brightest from around the world," but that is not happening. "The vast majority are ordinary people doing ordinary work." It's all about low-priced

labor, he says. "The use of foreign workers for cheap labor pervades the entire tech industry, including the large, mainstream U.S. firms, and including the foreign workers hired from U.S. universities."

The victims are really the best and brightest American engineers "being squeezed out of the market once they accumulate 10 years or so of experience," Matloff says on his website. And H-1B discourages United States college students from pursuing tech. "H-1B is causing an internal brain drain of American talents."

Conroy of Bright Future Jobs deplores statements such as an infamous one by the chief executive of HCL Technologies, another Indian body shop, that American tech grads are "unemployable." Conroy says that the body shops

and America's own tech chief executives "truly believe in the inferiority of Americans. [They believe] Americans are fat, lazy, and stupid."

On January 30, President Obama was asked by a woman why America keeps bringing in H-1Bs when her engineer husband can't get a job despite more than ten years of experience. A stunned Obama said, "Industry...tells me that they don't have enough highly skilled engineers." He promised to send the husband's résumé to American companies.

In 2007 and 2009, senators Dick Durbin of Illinois and Charles Grassley of Iowa introduced bills that would rein in H-1B and L-1 abuses. But neither bill got to the floor. Conroy concedes any bill is "dead right now" but thinks the time is right to put one in the hopper again.

"The [H-1B] program is plagued with fraud and abuse," says Durbin — a view that many share, hoping that the crackdown on Infosys will frighten some companies.

Two years ago, the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, part of Homeland Security, put out a memo that is also proving helpful in curbing abuses. An employer seeking to hire an H-1B worker must establish an employeremployee relationship. Basically, the employer must have a sufficient level of supervisory control over the employee — having the ability to hire and fire the worker and to control his or her work product. Some hoped the memo would be the death of the body shops that recruit in India and retain some control over hirees in the United States. Maybe the Infosys probes will do the job.

Qualcomm says that 60 percent of its new grads and interns in the United States are foreign nationals. Last year, chief executive Paul Jacobs said in a speech that one of the most important jobs of government was to reform laws so more of the "best and the brightest" can come in from abroad. Why? Jacobs didn't say it, but last year the president of Cornell University told a Senate committee that in 2006 foreign-born inventors were behind 72 percent of Qualcomm patents.

According to the American Association of Engineering Societies, foreignborn students get 42 percent of engineering master's degrees and 53 percent of engineering PhDs at American institutions. So Qualcomm and its fellow big companies have an argument, too. ■

enumerated in the report, but the district attorney took no action.)

The investigation was at the center of a 2009 wrongful termination suit filed by Scott Kessler, a former deputy director of the City's Economic Development Division. Before the City settled the lawsuit in November for \$200,000, the relationship between Li Mandri and powerful forces in Mayor Sanders's office had been exposed, including the relationship between Li Mandri and Sanders's chief of staff in 2008, Kris Michell.

Kessler's lawsuit states that Michell was unhappy that Kessler was working with investigators. Kessler's supervisor "Assistant Deputy Chief Murray informed CITY LIGHTS

[Kessler] that his cooperation...into the investigation of Li Mandri, combined with his cooperation with the Ethics Commission, angered Chief of Staff Michell," says the lawsuit.

The connection between Li Mandri and Michell doesn't end there. In February 2011, two months before Li Mandri started work for the downtown district, Michell took over as president of the Downtown San Diego Partnership.

Even more interesting was the process of approving Li Mandri's contract.

At its March 29 board meeting, the directors of the Downtown San Diego Partnership recommended going forward on "contract agreements" with Li Mandri, and on April 26 the board approved the contract. However, the improvement district's advisory board was not informed of the contract until their monthly meeting on May 10.

The minutes from that meeting read: "According to Kris Michell, due to the need for Mr. Li Mandri's input and the short timeline to complete the [request for proposal] process, the consultant contract for Marco Li Mandri went out of sequence and was taken to and approved by the [Downtown Partnership] Board first."

Li Mandri's contract with the Downtown Partnership was a sole-source contract, meaning no other consultants were asked to submit bids. The one-year contract was signed on June 17, 2011, and commenced on July 1.

In May, Li Mandri submitted his first bill for \$10,000. During that month, Li Mandri completed 12 tasks, includ-

ing a conference call with staff, "prep and attend" the May 10 advisory committee meeting, general administrative work, and attending a Downtown San Diego Partnership meeting with staff.

In October, Li Mandri completed nine tasks for his \$10,000 monthly fee. His tasks that month included putting together an outline for a PowerPoint presentation to the advisory committee; attending the advisory committee meeting; meeting with staff on "2005 Management District Plan, its services, adherence to the plan and using Chinatown LA as an example of a plan that provides greater detail," and touring homeless encampments.

Ryan Loofbourrow, executive director of Clean and Safe since August, says Li Mandri has been an asset to the team.

"During the month of May 2011, [Li Mandri] was hired to assist the Clean and Safe Program with managing the annual contractor request for proposal process," says Loofbourrow. "During that time, he helped negotiate contracts for such services as pressure washing, safety patrols, and landscaping. As a result, Clean and Safe saved more than \$200,000."

Loofbourrow says Li Mandri will evaluate the current practices and develop new strategies for administering services, including developing a district map of all properties, street furniture, trees, trash receptacles, newspaper stands, and lighting, and offering a strategy for managing the "downtown urban forest."

By having Li Mandri execute those tasks, Loof-bourrow says he is free to focus his energy on homelessness in downtown and to oversee other district contracts.

Neither Kris Michell nor Marco Li Mandri responded to requests for comment. ■

San Onofre — Precautionary shutdown operations began last night at San Onofre

Nuclear Generating Station's Unit 3 reactor due to "a possible leak in one of the unit's steam generator tubes," says a release from plant operator Southern California Edison. The generators siphon heat from a reactor's core and convert it into steam, which in turn spins turbines and produces power. The failure occurred despite a recent

multimillion-dollar project to replace the generators on both reactors.

"We detected a slight increase in radioactivity, but it's still within acceptable

levels," said plant spokesman Gil Alexander, noting that the shutdown was not mandatory under Nuclear Regulatory Commission rules.

Suspicions Had Substance

Election Tampering in Sweetwater Union High School District Board? Chula Vista — At the January 30 Sweetwater Union High School District board meeting, the Vega report was released. Parents, teachers, and students have been demanding the report for months. It appears their suspicions had substance.

Attorney Greg Vega was commissioned by the board in May of 2011 to look into work done by public relations professional Scott Alevy, who had been hired by the district's former counsel — Garcia, Calderon, and Ruiz — to assist with union relations. However. a Union-Tribune investigation of the invoice submitted to the district by Alevy suggested that some of the meetings billed by him did not take place.

A more serious part of the investigation pertained to the allegation of election tampering. Many of Alevy's meetings occurred shortly before the November 2010 election, when Jim Cartmill and Arlie Ricasa were reelected and John McCann was first elected to the Sweetwater board.

A cursory read of the report shows that former attorneys hired, for the district, a public consultant to consolidate and promote favored candidates. among other things. It also appears that only some boardmembers were aware of the nature of Alevy's work; some may not have known that the district hired him.

Chickens, Goats, and Bees

Council in Favor of Urban Agriculture Amendments San Diego — Today was a landmark day for urban agriculturalists, as the city council voted unanimously in favor of amendments to municipal code

that simplify the process for approving farmers' markets on private property, make minor adjustments to communitygarden regulations, and ease restrictions for keeping chickens, goats, and bees.

The amendments follow a \$50,000 grant awarded to the City of San Diego in March to pursue municipal code and general plan amendments supporting urban agriculture with the goal of stunting obesity rates by planning communities in ways that support increased physical activity and access to healthy foods.

"Healthy living depends on access to healthy food," said District 1 councilwoman Sherri Lightner. "That is why the urban agriculture movement continues to grow in popularity and why the City actually sought out this grant to encourage urban agriculture.... [It's] a great way to make fresh fruits and vegetables available at reasonable prices to neighborhoods who do not now have access to them, and it helps to build a sense of community where none existed before."

Did Coker's Endorsement Violate the Hatch Act? San Diego — Local resident and homeless advocate Kathryn Rhodes filed a formal complaint to the Office of the **Special Counsel on January 25** over the endorsement of district attorney Bonnie Dumanis

by County of San Diego public defender Henry Coker.

The complaint alleges that **Coker's endorsement violates** the Hatch Act, which prohibits state and local employees from using their authority to "influence for the purpose of interfering with or affecting the result of an election or a nomination for office" as well as "coercing, attempting to coerce, commanding, or advising a State or local officer or employee to pay, lend, or contribute anything of value to a party, committee, organization, agency, or person for political purposes.

"Citizen Coker can endorse anyone he wants. However, **County of San Diego Public Defender Coker is banned from** political speech and endorse-







The temples at Ayutthaya reveal a smorgasbord of

Ayutthaya, Thailand: City of Buddhas

The ancient Thai capital of Ayutthaya, about 80 kilometers north of Bangkok, is a worthwhile day trip if you're staying in Bangkok.

To really appreciate Ayutthaya, it helps to know a little about its history. Following Sukhothai, it was the capital of Thailand for 417 years, from 1350 to 1767. With a population of about 1 million, it was the largest city in the world in 1700. It became an important trading center and won the admiration of Western visitors, who compared it

favorably to the European capitals. In 1767 it reached a sudden demise when the Burmese destroyed the city.

Ayutthaya has been a UNESCO World Heritage site since 1991, but only remnants of its former grandeur remain. It sustained further damage from the floods that recently inundated Thailand.

The ruins at Ayutthaya do not quite equal Cambodia's Angkor Wat in their scale and impressiveness, largely due to the extent of the Burmese sacking. They are, nevertheless, quite interesting and impressive. As at Angkor Wat, the buildings that remain are temples and palaces, as these were the only buildings constructed of stone.

The most striking, memorable elements of the temples are the Buddhas that remain. The various temples at Ayutthaya reveal an astonishing smorgasbord of Buddhas: there's a huge golden Buddha, reclining Buddhas clad in saffron robes, mesmerizing rows of Buddhas, rings of Buddhas surrounding temples, bronzecast Buddhas, and even a Buddha carved into the trunk of a Banyan tree. (There are also several headless Buddhas that provide evidence of the ferocity of the Burmese sacking.)

Unfortunately, the Ayutthaya area was particularly affected by recent floods. The entire historic area was underwater for over a month, and damage at the temple complex is estimated to be in the area of \$20 million. Now that the waters have receded, UNESCO experts are assessing the damage. Historic murals are particularly at risk from salt stains and fungi.

Most of the temples have been reopened to the public. Wat Chai Watthanaram, one of the most visited temples, was especially damaged and remains closed. It is this temple that appears on the cover of the official Ayutthaya pamphlet. Several pagodas surround a central *chedi* (a Thai-style stupa) at this temple that one can climb for a magnificent view of the area. There is no timetable for its reopening.

Wat Phra Sri Sanphet is the larg-

est temple at Ayutthaya. The location of the former royal palace, Wat Phra Sri Sanphet features an impressive row of Buddha *chedis*. Other notable temples include Wat Yai Chai Mongkol, with its large reclining Buddha, and Wat Mahathat, with the famous Buddha head in a tree.

You can get to Ayutthaya from Bangkok via train, bus, boat, or minivan. The latter is the quickest and charges 65 *baht* (about \$2). Most of the tours that leave from the major hotels along the Chao Praya River involve river cruises to Ayutthaya that are substantially more expensive.

I set out for Ayutthaya in a minivan from Victory Monument Square in Bangkok. After the hour ride, I hired a *tuk tuk* to take me around to my selected


San Diego Outdoors with the Canyoneers

MOUNTAIN PALM SPRINGS

Multiple palm groves offer hikers lots of shade

Distance from downtown San Diego: Allow 2 hours' driving time. (Anza-Borrego Desert State Park) From I-8, exit on S2 at Ocotillo. Go northwest on S2 for about 15 miles to the signed Mountain Palm Springs Campground entrance and follow a short dirt road to the campground. From North County, drive to Julian and follow S78 west about 12 miles to the junction with S2. Turn south and drive 30 miles to the entrance of Mountain Palm Springs. Facilities available at the campground.

Hiking length: 2.5 miles loop. Add a mile to include a hike to Torote Bowl and/or a mile to include North Grove and Mary's Grove. • **Difficulty**: Easy to moderate; Elevation change up to 500 feet.

The best place to visit accessible desert palm groves in the southern Anza-Borrego Desert State Park is Mountain Palm Springs, found at the foot of the Tierra Blanca Mountains. Six oases with wellestablished trees provide shade for hikers and a nice respite for wildlife with intermittent streams of water. The palms are remnants from a time before there was a desert, when the climate could accommodate more tropical plants.

With a large leaf surface exposed to the sun and a short root system, the native Washington fan palm is an unlikely desert plant with its rapid rate of water evaporation and its dependence on water. However, an underground water source close to the surface allows the roots to sit in water while the thick palm frond shag coat provides insulation to keep the tree cool in the hot sun. The shag is also perfect for nest-


ing verdin and owls. The groves provided a sheltered home for the early Kumeyaay Indians who collected palm fruit and used palm leaves for construction material and fiber to make baskets. Several grinding areas are near the groves.

The approach to the trailhead from S-2 is up a well-drained alluvial fan with a rich desert scrub community consisting of several varieties of cactus, ocotillo, creosote, burro bush, and desert holly. Honey

mesquite is in the canyon drainage.

The most popular hike is a loop of almost 2.5 miles that visits four groves, starting from an interpretive panel at the trailhead. Shortly after starting the hike is Pygmy Grove, on the north side of the trail with almost 40 trees, many with burned skirts and trunks from a fire but very much alive with new seedlings in the grove. The surrounding hillsides are covered with tall barrel cactus and occasional milkweed. Encelia and krameria are found along the trail.

The trail curves to the left and then back to the right, following a ridge west that leads to Southwest Grove with well over 100 trees. This grove is about half-a-mile from



the beginning trailhead. If hikers want to extend this loop hike by a mile, they can follow the well-marked trail up the steep ridge to the south another half-mile to Torote Bowl, where several elephant trees are found.

Across from the Torote Bowl trail sign is a narrow and rather obscure trail that climbs a ridge on the north side next to a tagged elephant tree. This is the Surprise Grove trail, which drops into the next canyon after a little more than a half-mile hike. Surprise Grove has over 30 trees. Up-canyon less than a half-mile from Surprise Grove is Palm Bowl, tucked into a large mesquite-filled bowl with well over 50 trees.

Retrace your way back to Surprise Grove and follow the canyon down another half-mile to the junction with a canyon leading north to North Grove and Mary's Grove. The 2.5-mile loop hike turns right and heads back to the parking area and trailhead that is clearly visible.

By turning to the left or north at the junction of Surprise Canyon, another mile is added to the hike. North Grove is visible from the junction and from the trailhead. The wind has knocked down many of the palm

fronds that can be slick to walk on, so use caution. There are about 20 trees strewn in this narrow canyon. The climb becomes steep and rocky as one continues on to Mary's Grove, where there are over 30 trees in scattered groupings. Hike back down-canyon to return to your vehicle.

Ready to Kill

A poem by Carl Sandburg

Ten minutes now I have been looking at this. I have gone by here before and wondered about it. This is a bronze memorial of a famous general Riding horseback with a flag and a sword and a revolver on him.

I want to smash the whole thing into a pile of junk to be hauled away to

crap yard.

I put it straight to you,

After the farmer, the miner, the shop man, the factory hand, the fireman and the teamster.

Have all been remembered with bronze memorials, Shaping them on the job of getting all of us Something to eat and something to wear, When they stack a few silhouettes

Against the sky Here in the park,

And show the real huskies that are doing the work of the world, and feeding people instead of butchering them,

Then maybe I will stand here

And look easy at this general of the army holding a flag in the air, And riding like hell on horseback

Ready to kill anybody that gets in his way,

Ready to run the red blood and slush the bowels of men all over the sweet new grass of the prairie.



Carl Sandburg (1878-1967) was the son of poor Swedish immigrants who settled in Illinois. After serving in Puerto Rico during the Spanish-American War, he entered Lombard College where, in 1904, with encouragement

and financial help from professor Philip Green Wright, he self-published his first collection of poetry, Reckless Ecstasy. After college he married Lillian Steichen, the sister of the photographer Edward Steichen, and began working for the Social-Democrat Party in Wisconsin. After moving to Chicago, Sandburg became an editorial writer for the Chicago Daily News. With his first full collection, Chicago Poems, he began establishing his reputation as a plain-spoken but powerful American poet deeply concerned about social justice. In the 1920s, Sandburg wrote and published his monumental six-volume biography of Abraham Lincoln as well as his first collection of American folk ballads, The American Songbag. On periodic trips around the country, Sandburg would play his banjo and guitar, sing folk songs, and recite his poetry. San Diego Reader: What is your favorite subject on which to preach?

Pastor Kevin Womack: That's a great question because a lot of times we're tempted to go out into our favorite areas to the neglect of other things. But honestly, if it's not too predictable an answer — my favorite subject is Jesus, the Incarnation — the centerpiece of the Christian faith. Without God having sent his son to redeem us, there really is no Christianity.

SDR: What drew you to the Presbyterian Church?

PK: I was raised in a Lutheran Church as a child and in college I spent time in non-denominational churches, Calvary chapels, and Baptist churches... before I landed in the Presbyterian Church of America [PCA]. Some of the reformed tradition having to do with God's sovereignty and the covenant God makes with his people and the members of the church make with one another — those issues I

see as very biblical and also attractive in community life. So, I wouldn't say the PCA is the only church [at which] I could be a minister, but those particular highlights are what make it a great fit to be a minister in this denomination.

SDR: What is the mission of your church?

PK: We have broken our mission down into simple pieces... "Gather in worship, Grow in faith, and Go in mission." We really try to keep all this simple in terms of the church. We don't want to over-program people's lives by telling them they have to be here every night of the week. We'd rather leave space in their lives so they can meet

and know their neighbors and have relationships outside the church. We're trying to find a way to build a church community that blesses the world around it and doesn't find itself creating a Christian subculture.... So, for example, we don't want to hold a Christian version of an aerobics class at church — just go join a gym and do aerobics.

SDR: Where do you go when vou die?

PK: The Bible states that everyone, all human beings, will live for eternity, not in our physical bodies, but that our souls will live for eternity. It's pretty clear from Scripture that those who have allowed Jesus to be their savior will wind up spending eter-

nity in his presence. That's the promise Jesus spoke of throughout his earthly ministry. The Bible is also pretty clear that those who haven't allowed Jesus to be their savior will wind up spending that eternity someplace else. There are some descriptions of what that other place is like in Scripture, and it's not a good place, not a place you'd want to spend eternity.

While I wrestle with thinking about anybody spending eternity in that place, in the end it makes some sense, because folks who wanted to do nothing with Jesus here and now probably wouldn't want to spend eternity in his presence either. But I think the key is we don't know who will and won't be in God's presence, and we're not expected to know this. We're told throughout Scripture that...rather than trying to determine all those things ourselves, we are to focus on showing Jesus to the world and sharing his message with the world.

SAN DIEGO OPERA'S SALOME: NUDITY, ATHLETICISM, BEEF

Lindstrom. The topic: nudity.

We're continuing with our discussion about San Diego Opera's *Salome* with bass-baritone Greer Grimsley and soprano Lise

Lise: "I don't really want to be naked. It's not mandatory. It's certainly up for discussion. The level of nakedness is an issue."

Greer: "I've always said that nudity in opera is redundant. You've basically opened yourself up. It's not just this mechanism [gesturing to his throat]. When you sing, it's connected to your soul. It's connected to everything you are. In that sense we're sharing more than what our physical bodies are."

Lise: "I always find nudity to be more information than I want in the seductive category. When I see a naked body onstage, I think, *Nah*. What I do like is not seeing it and having the suggestion of it — the perception of it but not the full thing. Bodies are not all that interesting when they're naked. When you put stuff around them and package them, then I find bodies to be quite tantalizing."

SDReader: "The nudity in Salome isn't like the Rheinmaidens being naked at the end of Götterdämmerung. That is obviously a representation of a pure and natural state. Salome is a different story."

Lise: "It is, and you need to have that conversation. How much is the nudity used as a tool to get what she wants? It's all about checks and balances in this opera — and power asser-

tion. How far does she have to go to get what she wants?"

Greer: "The Dance of the Seven Veils' isn't

about nudity. It's about anticipation. It usually doesn't end in nudity, but that's become the traditional take on it."

SDReader: Talk about the athleticism associated with world-class opera singing...

Lise: "I am so glad you brought up the link to athletes. It is completely fair. We train with as much intensity, dedication, and focus as a professional athlete has. We have a 'game day' routine before performances and we have the pressure to perform in front of a critical audience. It's not just the day of the performance but the days before and after. We need to listen to our bodies and hear what the body is telling us."

Greer: "It's true, except our success rate has to be much higher than an athlete. We can't bat .350 and call that a success. We have to hit the ball out of the park 99.9 percent of the time."

SDReader: "So you can't miss half your free-throws like Shaq?"

Lise: "In singing opera, that's called fretired."

During the interview, one of the opera staff poked her head in and asked Greer what he wanted for dinner before the shows: beef, veggie or fish?

Greer: "Beef. This is definitely a beef show."

SAN DIEGO OPERA'S SALOME: "THE VOICE"

In her first two productions with San Diego Opera, Lise Lindstrom has portrayed princesses with a thing for beheadings. As Turandot, she beheaded the Prince of Persia, and as Salome,

Jokanaan.

Turandot and Salome have striking similarities. Both are motivated by revenge and obsession. Both are young and in power. Both have never experienced love in any form and react violently to its first expressions.

Turandot is the ice princess, Salome is the temptress, and Lise Lindstrom is phenomenal. We watched Lindstrom transform Salome from a pouting, petulant, teenager into a resolved and obsessed adult. Her singing also matched the development of the character. Lindstrom started *Salome* with a lighter tone and gradually colored it as the character's obsession grew.

I didn't notice a great singer or actor, I noticed a character. I saw Salome on the stage. During her adoration of the head, I heard a patron exclaim, "Whoa!" That was an involuntary response to an authentic situation.

The other principals were equally matched to Lindstrom. Hopefully some of the applause from opening night was directed toward general and artistic director Ian Campbell for assembling the principal quartet of *Salome* (Lise Lindstream).

strom), Jokanaan (Greer Grimsley), Herod (Allan Glassman), and Herodias (Irina Mishura).

Irina Mishura was making her company debut as Herodias, and I hope we see her again — soon. She boozed her way around the stage with the confidence of an overripe beauty who has given up seduction for sarcasm. There were moments when Mishura's voice threatened to swallow the entire Civic Theater in one glorious gulp.

Allan Glassman, returning to San Diego as Herod, played a despotic politician yet also gave us glimpses of the Herod that ruled Galilee for 42 years under three different Caesars. The temptation would be to play Herod as a fool, but Glassman gave us flesh and blood instead of a one-dimensional caricature.

This brings us to Greer Grimsely as Jokanaan. What can I say? Greer Grimsely is a treasure. I've watched him sing at San Diego Opera during the past 12 years, and I never cease to be amazed.

Lise Lindstrom admitted, "We call Greer 'the Voice." \blacksquare

At the eatin'-contest table, a gang of guys and gals chants, "Eat! Eat! Eat! Eat!"

hat's that guy eating?" yells
Carla. "It looks ginormous!"
"Say what?"

"I said...'

We're shouting at each other at the new Nicky Rottens place in Coronado. Carla wanted to meet here at the bay end of Orange Avenue after her hair appointment, so we could see the lights across the water.

But inside, *thumpa*, *thumpa*, *thumpa*. The music's in charge.

Still, view-wise, here, right at the corner of First Street, you get pretty much that panorama of everything across the bay that Carla wanted: illuminated downtown highrises, the red-and-green navigation lights of water taxis.

Nicky's newest place (he started off in the Gaslamp) is full. Lotsa shouting about the next deployment, housing allowances, Navy life.

At one table, they got some kind of eating contest going on.

"Hi, folks," this gal Jessica says to us. "Drinks? Eats?"

Me, I'm starting off lite. I get a large lemonade, one with the true taste I've grown to appreciate — actual lemons. Carla has her

new crush, ginger ale. They're \$2 each.

We've agreed it's gonna be burger or bust, because these guys have an awesome reputation. Not cheap, but, unlike Burger Lounge, at least fries are included in the price.

Two burgers cruise past. I swear, each is as tall from bun to bun as my outstretched hand, pinky to thumb. Back and forth I go, tryin' to decide between a Rottens Bacavo burger and the Maui Wowi. ("Whata da minkya isa

Bacavo?" asks the menu. Then it tells you: bacon, avo, burger, cheese, \$10.95.)

For the same price, they have the Maui

Wowi, with a pineapple ring and teriyaki. Hmm...have a little craving for sweetness...

Carla almost falls for her other obsession, hotdogs. 'Specially the "Tijuana Style. Home Wrecker" (\$9.95). They're wrapped in bacon, and you get

chopped jalapeños with them. They use Hebrew National beef frankfurters. "Best flavor, bar none," Carla says. But she ends up going for a Rottens Stinky Burger (\$10.95, Bacon, blue cheese), because of the blue cheese. And, yes, I have the Maui Wowi. I know pineapple in a burger's probably as cool as asking for pineapple on your pizza in New York City.

But the Food Fashion Police will never make it back here.

Whew. A moment to look around. Our table, for starters, looks expensive. Glossy burl walnut, Carla says. And Jessica says the bar's backboard and overhang are solid mahogany. Right above us, a 6-by-10-foot screen has guys kicking footballs almost into our drinks.

"They really went to a lot of trouble," Jessica says. "They spent a lot."

"You've been here before, right?" Carla asks me, like I've been holding out on her.

I have. I remember it exactly. September 30...spectacular. They were brand new then, Rottens owner Nick Tomasello having just taken over the Island Sports Bar, and also the corner Laundromat. The result: big new Rotten bar on the island. The locals were thrilled

It was rockin' that night. Sunset.

Outside, the green-flash crowd. (I know, you need to face west for that, and this bar faces pretty much east across the bay, but the sun was giving a show anyway, daubing the mainland waterfront hotels with a slow, golden paintbrush.)

But the real action was inside.

Happy hour. I'd ordered a Ballast Point Yellowtail Pale Ale (\$3) and

Happy hour. I'd ordered a Ballast Point Yellowtail Pale Ale (\$3) and a plate of fried zucchini slices (four bucks, half the usual price). So then this guy named Shawn Burkholder, the manager, comes up and pours my Yellowtail, and starts...juggling. Not beer coasters, but bottles. Champagne, beer bottles, full. Things that could go crash in the night. Up, around, and behind him. Man was crazy-perfect.

"That's nothing," he said to an open-jawed Scottish couple. "Let me offer you a drink."

Right there, he started assembling one, two, eight large metal beakers. Turned some upside down. Placed five champagne glasses around the base, poured raspberry vodka, lemon juice, triple sec, cranberry juice, and Sprite, then scooped them together so each sat partly inside the one behind it...Then he held all five up horizontally over his head like a concertina — and started pouring.

Lawdy!

He filled all five glasses simultaneously, in long streams. Not a drop spilt.

But, tonight, there's no sign of Shawn. No tricks going down at the bar.

At the eatin'-contest table, a gang of guys and gals chants, "Eat! Eat! Eat! Eat!"

One guy has his fangs into an obscenely big burger. I see on the menu, "Da Ultimate Challenge" burger, 2½ pounds of meat, plus fixins. Costs \$19.95, or free if you eat it in half an hour. Finish within the hour, you still have to pay but get your name engraved on

a hall-of-eating-fame plaque. But they have a strict "no going out and upchucking on the sidewalk halfway through" rule. You leave your seat before finishing, you've lost.

Jessica comes with our burgers. Man, oh, man. These are half-pounders, humungous in their way.

I'm getting decadent whiffs of Carla's blue cheese burger. And the sounds as she squishes into her first bite! Have to stop myself from asking if she wants to share. The glint in her eye tells me, "Don't even go there."

Besides, whatever Gothamites may think, that sweet-savory flavor in the Maui Wowi is glorious to my jangling taste buds. Teriyaki talks back to the pineapple. Just like Filipino people, I love combos of sweet and savory.

The garlicky fries are great, too.

I'm just about to lunge into my second bite when a roar goes up from the contest table.

"Yeah! You da man! Don't throw up! He did it! Over here!"

Here's hoping he can hold it. ■

Tijuana: Dogs de la Calle

Shout-out to the real thing!

The past couple of times coming back from TJ I've ended up on the street, looking for one

last dog. This time it's around ten at night, corner of Avenida de la Amistad ("Friendship Avenue") and the stalls leading back to the border.

José Ismael is here with his cart. "Exquisitos Hot Dogs" and "Hamburguesas Deliciosas y Calientitas." You can see it from a distance. He's standing in the flaring light of his cart's gaslamp, dressed in about four layers under a white apron, rubbing his hands in the cold. He's an island in the dark.

I ask him for a *chico* hotdog and a coffee: \$1.20 for the dog (the *grande* is \$2), \$1 for the coffee... instant crystals poured into a cup of hot water.

Meanwhile José works at the dog. The bun, the mayo, the wiener wrapped with bacon, *cebollas asadas* (grilled onions), chunky salsa, tomato

chunks, mustard. He delivers the final long squirt of ketchup with a flourish.

His friend José García trundles out of the dark with his *elote* (corn) cart (\$1 each for a small ear; \$1.50 to \$2 for larger ones). We stand here in the biting chill, walking on the spot from one foot to the other.

Oh, yes. This, out here, is the real thing. My face is a mess from first bite.

"I've been working here 12 years," says José Ismael, "5 p.m. to midnight. It used to be a good spot. Still is okay on Friday nights. But these days I sell maybe 30, 40 in a night. Before, I'd be selling

250. And I have to pay for the cart and the food and the gas. I have a wife and two kids to feed. It's difficult"

José García and I nod. At the same time, I'm enjoying the crunchy heat of the *salchicha* — the wiener — with the spicy heat of the salsa.

Yes, I've had more magnificent dogs, but chewing and chatting out here in the last few feet of

Latin America, three guys shivering in the late-night gaslamp, this you can't buy.

BTW: U.S.-bound border crossing pedestrians are being diverted through the 1936 customs building while they upgrade the main one. For the next two years. Allow extra time.

Quality Social isn't screwing around. They invited me — a person who once filled out an evaluation card for the place and thus got on their email list — to eat free. Free? The email:

"Hello again. You may have noticed we've been closed the past few days, as mentioned in this morning's Union-Tribune article. Fresh faces, new attitude, an innovative organic wine program by renowned Sommelier Jason Wagner, and our awardwinning culinary program led by nationally recognized Executive Chef Jared Van Camp has been completely revamped."

Apparently, they were still screwing around a little bit. That second sentence would read a lot better like this: "We're featuring fresh faces, a new attitude, and an innovative organic wine program designed by renowned Sommelier Jason Wagner.



All the elements of your favorite chain eatery with crazy crap on the walls.

Plus, our award-winning culinary program — led by nationally recognized Executive Chef Jared Van Camp — has been completely revamped." But good PR work is hard to come by, so we won't quibble further.

The email continued: "We'd love to offer you dinner this weekend ON US! Email us at info@ qualitysocial.com for confirmation details and to make your reservation for dinner on Friday or Saturday."

Well, now: Papa likes free food. I called right up and made as late a reservation as I could for the three of us (me, the wife, Sophia). Turns out that was 8 p.m., and with good reason. (More on that later.)

Quality Social bills itself as "A Bar. With Food." and promises "All the elements of your favorite neighborhood bar. Elevated." The restaurant — er, bar with food — sits at the corner of Sixth and F Street downtown, and the signage on the two fronts is indicative of the place's bifurcated spirit: "Food & Drink" is not on the same sign or even on the same side of the building.

Inside, the story was the same. On one side of the space is the bar (albeit with banquettes lining one wall) and on the other side, a bunch of high marble tables and backless stools (with a bar lining one wall).

The bar in the "dining room" side of things was closed when we arrived, which made our side of the room much quieter and more restau-

things quieter because it opened shortly before we departed and was immediately filled with the sort of people who fill downtown bars on a Friday night (read: young, eager, carefully dressed, and, in the case of the men, even more carefully unshaven). It also immediately became much louder. I'm guessing this is why 8 p.m. was the latest possible dinner reservation. At a certain point, the bar-culture side of things takes over.

rant-y. I know it made

We started on the bar side while we waited for our table. I checked out the lighted alcoves in the curving, textured wall while the wife ordered a Manhattan on the dry side.

She was delighted by the "attentive, cheerful, genuinely friendly" service she received. "Within 90 seconds of sitting down, three different people asked if I'd been helped," she marveled. "And the bartender told me to let her know if it wasn't just right." She had to marvel pretty loudly to be heard, however: my first note on the place was *thump thump*.

"If no one is dancing, do you need this much bass?" I asked. "It's kind of clubbed up in here."

"I think it's more 'garage,' " countered Sophia. I took her point but insisted on noting the ungarage finery of the light fixtures. Plus, how many garage-style restaurants serve a \$23 beer (Jolly Pumpkin Bam Noire Farmhouse)?


Alexandria, our sweet and enthusiastic waitress, explained that we had been invited to dine for free because Quality Social is "trying to get people to pay attention to the second half of the menu." That is, beyond the fancy fries and the charcuterie/cheese goodness.

The wife and I could each pick one app or salad, plus one entrée or sandwich. (Sophia was there to observe and imbibe.) I asked Alexandria for her suggestions, per Specialty of the House's specs.

"For appetizers, the duck wings [\$11]. And the smoked duroc pork Cubano sandwich [\$11]



is really good. For entrées, actually, the grilled organic salmon with pumpkin seed pesto [\$17]."

The wife ordered the spicy Mexican shrimp ceviche (\$9) to round things out, and we were off. Oh, except for drinks. Was there a house cocktail? "The H," said Alexandria. Very good, then. We ordered, and settled in for what turned out to be a very long wait.

The wife could not help but contrast the delay with her experience at the bar. "We're left high and dry here. We don't even have drinks, and when people don't have drinks, they get cranky."

Alexandria thanked us for our patience when she did bring the drinks, and the apps followed in short order. But then the entrées followed in short order after the apps, well before we were ready for them.

So, the specialties. First, the good news. If you like cucumber, the H cocktail is gorgeous. Served in a highball with a

slice of cucumber, it's made from cucumber-infused vodka that's spiked with St. Germain Elderflower, lime juice, and a touch of cracked pepper. Every sparkly sip radiates cucumber, but depending on what you've just put in your mouth, various other elements shine forth: the rich floral of the Elderflower, the tart of the lime, the slight heat of the pepper. Hooray! All the elements of your favorite Pimm's cup, elevated. "It's an afternoon tea cocktail!" proclaimed Sophia.

Also great was the pulled pork Cubano sandwich, which was all the elements of your favorite Montecristo. Elevated. "This is a great bar sandwich," said the wife. Meaning "hot and heavy duty."

"The bread is cooked to a perfect brown, the pork is a little chewy, but still tender and moist, and then you've got the ham and the melted Swiss cheese..." She paused to swoon. "And the tang of the mustard. And I love the crunch of the pickle" - sliced long and not overly briny.

Less great but still good was the salmon. It was clearly a fine piece of fish, rich to the point of decadence and perfectly cooked. And if you closed your eyes and concentrated, you could pick out the pumpkin seed flavor in the pesto. But the accompanying roasted spaghetti squash lacked that roasty intensity of flavor, and nothing on the plate had a chance of standing up to the bed of bitter braised greens. "Every element's fine," said the wife. "But it doesn't make a whole."

Duck wings are duck wings: greasier, thicker skinned, and more delicious than chicken wings. (Chicken wings you eat for the coating. Here, you didn't even need the cucumber-mint raita, though it was tasty.) Maybe eat three or four and share the rest. Otherwise, they can drag you down.

Disappointing: the ceviche. Sweet tomato provided the biggest flavors, beating out both the shrimp and the spice on the shrimp and blotting out any hint of citrus acidity.

By this point, the bar on our side had opened. As we filled out our surveys on the place the price of our free meal — the crowd surged around us and the wife concluded, "I just don't think you can be a bar and a restaurant. I think you have to decide which you want to be. I'm sitting at a bar stool, eating salmon with pumpkin seed pesto, and I can't see my food because it's so dark. They're trying to put together too many elements."

With that, we headed out the door and across the street to watch people ride the mechanical bull at the Double Deuce.

Superior Buttercream at Cupcakes Squared

The cupcake craze of the recent past is gone, but the cupcake shops remain. It's likely that most of them will be around for a while, since no real alternative pastry fashion has risen. Pie was supposed to be the next big thing, but the lack of hip pie boutiques springing up all over the place indicates otherwise. Regardless, cupcakes are

Cupcakes Squared, crammed

into a Point Loma mini-mall, has ample parking. Despite the fall of the cupcake from high fashionability, business seems to still be fairly brisk on a weekend, which inspires confidence.

The bakery doesn't do much more than cupcakes. They've recently added some cookie bars to the menu, but the business remains cupcake dependent after four years. This might make Cupcakes Squared look like a one-trick-pony, but there's an advantage to having a narrow inventory. Namely, that everything is likely to be fresh. It's also very cool and European to display just a few items in a display case.

Does anybody not know by now that this company bakes square cupcakes? Giving credit where credit's due, Cupcakes Squared did pioneer the idea, but it's nothing amazing once it's become easy to do at home. There's something geometrically satisfying about a square cake in a square box, however.

Anyway, the point of taking a fresh look at an established spot is this: Cupcakes Squared may have the nicest buttercream around. Velvety and light, the

icing on top of their signature square cakes is a cut above the rest.

Since the icing is about a third of the average cupcake by volume, it's important for it to be delicious. Unfortunately, frosting is where so many pastries fall short. Too heavy, too sweet, too grainy. All these problems commonly send cakes to the territory of the underwhelming.

The cake beneath the frosting is...well...cake. It's more of a vessel for the great frosting than anything else. Their lilikoi cupcake, for example, is plain vanilla cake. Perfectly nice in its own right, but what takes it to the next level is the passionfruit buttercream that is spot-on in terms of sweetness and flavor to accent the plain cake beneath.


The "graham cracker" cake that forms the base of the s'mores cupcake deserves special mention for being chewy and substantial but not too heavy. It's novel as cake goes and ends up tasting much like its namesake campfire treat when topped with chocolate buttercream.

Las Gorditas Restaurant

Gorditas ("little fatties") are a taco-alternative that aren't as widely available as burritos or quesadillas.

Made from masa dough that's about halfway between the filling for a tamal and a corn tortilla, the little pockets are stuffed with various fillings. They're not impossible to find, but discovering gorditas can take a little extra nosing around.

Surrounded by perfume outlets in an industrial-retail district of Chula Vista, Las Gorditas Restaurant specializes in frying, stuffing, and serving up gorditas. Even with a few other items on the menu, the gorditas are the star of the show.

The restaurant is larger than expected, with booths and tables tucked behind dividers and around corners. The decor is mostly pink and tan and surprisingly pleasant, considering the industrial feel of the surrounding neighborhood. English signage is delightfully hard to come by, though there is a small, supplemental menu in English tacked on the wall behind the counter.

The gorditas themselves are scrumptious and generously stuffed with all manner of fillings. Two of them should be enough food for most people, and they only cost \$2.35 each.

Chicharrones (pork skin) in salsa verde is indulgent, and maybe a little odd for some people, but executed well. Rajas (sautéed green chilies) with potatoes and sour cream is spicy and satisfying for a meatless alternative. Las gorditas al

pastor had a good, deep flavor, but the meat was a little on the dry side.

Other selections include bean and cheese, cactus, carne asada, and chicken mole.

Everything in the gorditas is on the soft side, from the braised meats to the chewy masa dough, so adding some shredded cabbage from the condiment bar is a great way to mix things up, texturally. The hot salsa is hot, not just labeled as hot, which is a pleasant find for people who like their food *muy picosa*.

From 5 to 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. to close every night, happy hour offers \$5 pizzas (pepperoni, Italian sausage, or Margherita), \$3 house wine, \$5 cocktails, and \$3 domestic beer.

These prices are for in-bar only, and the bar's not huge: three two-seater tables, one four-top, three seats at the high bar, and two seats at the low bar. First come, first serve.

Although the restaurant offers no beer on tap, and James the slow-poke, cherubfaced bartender has to use his smartphone to look up drink recipes, I appreciate the fact that he knows I like lime in my Corona (\$5.49).

Tonight, I have the little one in tow. We sit at the low bar. Knicks and Dolphins on the screen over James's head. James brings my beer and lemonade,







Burn, Baby, Burn: **Bahn Thai Not Scared of Spice**

There's a guy in tears at one of the three small tables inside Banh Thai. There are three more tables outside, and that is all the seating available.

"They make it way spicy here!" he says. "They don't play around!" He's not a wimp, either. I'm tougher than most güeros when it comes to spicy foods, and I order my plates "hot" at this little University Heights shop. "Extra hot" would probably be too fiery to be enjoyable. I'd have to be in the mood for punishment. In that rare case, the tearful customer assures me that the kitchen at Banh Thai will make dishes as spicy as the guests want, even to the point of agonizing, eye-watering, mouthscorching overkill.

The food presentation isn't fanciful. Everything comes on a styrofoam plate (or in a take-out container), and the water's in a self-serve bubbler in the corner. But the service is friendly, the tables are clean, the food's well above average, and the prices are low. The main dishes are priced at \$7.95 for chicken, beef, pork, tofu, or vegetables and \$8.95 for the executive option, shrimp.

Bahn Thai's drunken noodles are quite good — spicy, plentiful, and generous with the fried basil. An entrée is enough food to fill most diners without an appetizer, and the tom yum soup (\$3.95) or a shredded papaya salad (\$5.95) will get the job done in a heartbeat. The red curry plate is milder than the drunken noodles and much richer. It's equally filling, however, as it comes with an enormous amount of rice.

Industrial Grind Coffee: Hard to Find Caffeine

Normally I don't go for midafternoon coffee, even though it's my favorite time of day to drink the stuff. I go to bed early, and a caffeine buzz will trash my sleep cycle.

But today is different. Today I have a lot of writing to do,

and I need something to kick the brain into high gear. The deadline on a short-story contest is fast approaching, and my production thus far has been nil. So, off to Industrial Grind Coffee.

Just north of University Avenue on Park Boulevard and set back across a broad sidewalk, Industrial Grind is easy to miss. But in this corner of Hillcrest/ University Heights, the coffeeshop quotient is underrepresented and Industrial Grind deserves a better look from passersby. Because I live nearby, the shops up the hill near Park and Adams are a bit far for walking with baggage. Filter is always overcrowded, and Starbucks is, well, Starbucks.

The barista pours a double shot of espresso and makes a hot chocolate to go, which had better get my creative juices flowing. She responds to my overburdened writer's tale of woe with the tidbit that she's an active writer, too, and directs me to her blog.

The espresso is on the longer side but has enough crema and is on par with the competition's. I'll order it ristretto next time, since that's more my style. Still, this was a better shot of coffee than I've had at lots of places

in town.

The list of specialty lattes is extensive, and there are some novel items that I haven't seen on other menus. A "salted caramel latte" piques my curiosity, but I had to go with plain espresso to get an unadulterated feel for the coffee at Industrial Grind. Right now there's a "3 at 3" special: all 16 oz. lattes are \$3 from 3 to 6 p.m.

The shop looks minuscule from the outside, but it runs deep and there is a lot of seating. Wi-Fi is available, and the inside/outside design (sort of like Jungle Java in O.B. but much cozier) will be killer for sitting and writing on a warm afternoon.

Industrial Grind is a bit of a hidden gem at this point, due to the camouflaged location, but I think I'll make a return trip next time I need to get some work done and I want to avoid the crowds at the more mainstream shops.

Case in point, many of the restaurants and bars in the area cater to men on their "men"us,

such as Baja Betty's (don't let the lady's name fool you). With the addition of Gossip Grill, the girls finally have a home-base in Hillcrest (although men and all the colors of the rainbow between the two are welcome with open arms).

They must have had a lot of fun coming up with names for the cocktail menu. Among the many creative libations (averaging \$8) are the Prowling Puma, Strap-On Margarita, Cherry Black G-String, Camel Toe Mojito, and Bloody Bitch.

David and I shared the grilled asparagus, a light yet flavorful dish with just the right amount of char, oil, and salt. One of the appetizers, two small Chicagostyle hotdogs, caught David's attention and he ordered it as his entrée. Melted cheddar, fresh onions, pepperoncini, and tomatoes were the crunchy, complementary toppings to the tasty dogs.

Because it was suggested by our server and people at neighboring tables, I got the Italian Stallion flatbread. The delightfully chewy dough was covered in a fresh pepper sauce, sweet sausage, and provolone cheese.

The food was enjoyable, but what struck me about the place was the relaxed atmosphere. The outdoor seating area is cozy, the staff is friendly and helpful, and the prices are as palatable as the provocatively named beverages. Next time I go, I think I'll try the Coochie Crawler.

Vista Beer Tour: Mother Earth Brew Co.

Brewhouses are opening at an astounding rate around San Diego County, but no region has experienced as much growth over the past year and a half as the city of Vista.

Once home to just two breweries — Green Flash Brewing Company (which moved to Mira Mesa last year) and Lamppost Pizza's alter-ego brewpub, Back Street Brewery — there are now six brewing operations calling the North County municipality home. Last weekend I visited five of them, taking time to catch up with the brewers.

My third stop was at Mother Earth Brew Co., a combination brewery, tasting room, and homebrew supply store. When I first visited Mother Earth in June of 2010, their equipment setup looked more like a soup kitchen, with several large metal pots stacked atop portable burners. It's a common setup for a nanobrewery, the term applied to the lowest production class of commercial brewing operations.

Back then they brewed three batches of beer a day, producing a rotating assortment of beers

Mother Earth owner and head brewer, Dan Love, now has a more substantial ten-barrel brewhouse that's poised to pump out 700 barrels of beer in 2012. He's also purchased additional fermenters, an external brite tank, and a bottling line. 22-ounce bombers will be available starting in May or June.

Now that their current location is built up, they are looking to open a second space in Vista's Old Town area that will house a taproom and another homebrew store. They plan on installing a second brewhouse there so they can transition their current digs into a production brewery. This hefty project is set to kick off in March.

Holy powdered sugar, Batman!

Smiling Johnny informs me it'll take a few minutes for the medium roast to brew, and because I want to make the most of my 25 minutes, I tell him I'll take the darker roast. And I'm glad I do. It's really good, a fine accompaniment to the sweet and strangely dense croissant. By the time I give up on the unexpectedly-cakey-onthe-inside pastry, my jeans are spotted with sugar, and I'm sure my face is, too.

New (as of September 1) owner Sam says things are about to change. In March the place will close for remodeling, and the cold, stark will be replaced with "comfortable and cozy." Though he won't reveal specifics, he does say he's planning "warmer colors, going towards rust."

Some menu items will change, but fear not, the pistachio pancakes aren't going anywhere. The popular special, Argentina steak scramble, will be added to the menu, along with ten local draft beers.

The date's not set, but expect the reopening (with a new name) sometime in April.

Kebab King

Kebab shops seem to be springing up all over the place, which is a nice trend. One of the most recent arrivals to the Middle Eastern take-out scene, Kebab King on University Avenue, is in the building recently vacated by Jack's BBQ. For whatever reason, the "BBQ" insignia survived the remodel, thus creating a sort of culinary palimpsest that suggests a Greco-Memphis fusion that will probably never come to be in this world.

The decor is cheerful, orange, and bright. Everything is still shiny and new and polished. The place has been put together to be more welcoming than the big, square, concrete-and-tile building might suggest.

The kebabs are a bit unusual. Available with lamb or chicken that's been cooked on a spit and sliced off to order, the namesake sandwiches can come on the expected pita bread or — and here's where things get odd — on a grilled flour tortilla.

The tortilla option might seem a little awkward at first, but it proves to be a clever variation on the theme. A Rohdes Kebab (\$5.49) arrives dressed with lettuce, tomatoes, onions, cucumbers, and feta cheese. It includes a spiced tomato sauce that's strange on a kebab such as this. The sauce has a richly concentrated tomato flavor that resembles pizza sauce. This detail is bothersome, as it doesn't fit the flavor of the meat and fresh greenery. On a positive note, the sandwich is enormous and makes a filling meal.

Kebab King offers burgers and shawarma sandwiches as well, all of which can be augmented as combos for an additional \$2. This adds fries and a fountain drink and pushes the calorie content into borderline dangerous. The man behind the counter was kind enough to substitute a small order of the shiraz salad for the fries. It was delightful, featuring tomatoes, onions, cucumbers, and parsley in a piquant marinade.

Big plus: Kebab King sells beer! They have Karl on draft (\$3.99/glass or \$8.99 for a 49 oz. pitcher) and a bunch of stuff in bottles. Sitting around sipping on a Mythos Lager and chewing on a kebab might be a welcome respite from burritos and Coronas.

in May 2007 from a station in Albany, New York. Hired as afternoon DJ and music director, he moved up to program director about three years ago. Recognizing the huge impact that 91X

artists he says that 91X should have never backed away from, "like the Cure, U2, Depeche Mode, and Oingo." Capone also tossed out its all-talk morning show and started playing music during the morning drive time.

About a year and a half ago, a Capone-driven 91X started showing a significant increase in ratings. It currently shows a 3.0 ratings share among all listeners; its closest competitor, FM94/9, has about half that (1.6), according to Arbitron.

Capone says that 91X had some rehabilitation to do. "When Noble ran it [1983-'96], it was a tremendously well-run station. When Jacor/Clear Channel came in, they killed it. They did seemingly irreparable damage to the brand. When [Clear Channel] sold it and it was relaunched as an independent station, it started to come back. People in San Diego were very aware of the corporatism versus local. 91X means more to San Diego than any other station means to any other city."

The tarnished Clear Channel/ corporate image surrounding 91X prompted FM94/9 to switch to modern rock in 2004. Capone countered 94/9's playlist by giving significant airplay to upand-coming national artists such as M83, the Naked and Famous, and Florence + the Machine and local artists Deadfeather Moon and Transfer. "Every month we give a local artist as much airplay as we give a national artist," says Capone. "When we started playing [local band] Little Hurricane, they went from two kids [originally] from Bakersfield to where they now have management, a lawyer, an agent, are getting radio airplay in other cities, and they are actively being pursued by labels."

Capone feels he was slandered on FM94/9 last October when he put on two days of commercial-free radio against a 48-hour all-talk "Mikeython" on 94/9, which was anchored by morning host Mike Esparza. "They said on air that I hate kids and that I am against charity and for autism. They said I was the bully who beats up special-needs kids in the classroom. They said the yellow and black of the 91X logo represents hate."

So, why no lawsuit?

"I know who I am. I know our listeners know how to tell truth from lies."

I ask if the outburst could be tied to a frustration that the Mikey Show is getting trounced in the ratings by 91X?

"Yes, I imagine getting beat like that could cause some frustration, but I don't know what's going on in Mike's head."

Capone leaves at the end of February. His successor has not been named.

Classically Hip. "It's almost impossible to make a living playing original music in San Diego, but there are other ways a player can make money," says bassist Grant Clarkson. "Look at all the musical theater and opera that goes on around town."



In addition to found sound and household percussion, Harumi recorded jam sessions with drummer Mike Hams (A Scribe Amidst the Lions, V Drago, Brian Ellis Group) at Control Center for the Sun Studios, chopped up the recordings, and built songs around the beats.

The result is a mercurial aesthetic often rooted in post-Dilla instrumental hip-hop beats of the Flying Lotus, Nosaj Thing, Baths, and Gold Panda ilk.

While finding parallels with the L.A. beat crowd, Room E readily branches off on tangents of ambient pop, drum and bass,

afrobeat, IDM, jazz, and postrock, alternately reminiscent of Squarepusher, the Brainfeeder roster, Boards of Canada, and the Cure.

Despite his kindred rhythm with the local and L.A. beat sounds, Harumi says he's mostly shared lineups with bands. "I'd like to see people and genres come together a little more."

Using Ableton as a tool to arrange live instruments rather than purely electronic sounds and performing with a live setup of turntables, MIDI keys, a Kaoss pad, and a laptop, Harumi says, "I didn't really aim to make an electronic album, so I don't really emphasize the electronic aspect as much. I try not to think in terms of genre when I'm making music."



Year of the Sax

"Back then, it was not unusual for me to play 29 times in 24 days. Now, it's once or twice a week."

y the end of last year, music journalists were tagging it the Year of the Sax. Why? Because Lady Gaga hired Clarence Clemons to play on "Born This Way."

But that's not all: Odd Future had a saxy moment, as did Deerhunter, Patrick Wolf, Janine Rostron, and a nutter on YouTube

named Sergio Flores who calls himself the Sexy Sax Man. He's a shirtless guy with a mullet and an alto sax who bombs classrooms, fast-food lines, and football games with cheesy George Michael. His buffoonery has gone viral.

Was 2011 really the Year of the Sax? We check in with some local saxists:

Todd Rewoldt, Swarmius

"Well, from the looks of it in Taiwan, it is definitely not the Year of the Sax, unless we are talking about saxophone manufacturing, which is really exploding here right now.

"Katy Perry and Lady Gaga recently featured sax solos, including every saxophonist's favorite saxophonist to criticize, Kenny G. Actually, compared to what we had to listen to from Kenny in the 1990s, he has re-emerged as a mildly entertaining actor. Perhaps he missed his calling. However, since I am a saxophonist, it is always the Year of the Sax. So, how to continue the trend? Kanye West, do you need a saxophonist? Give me a call."

Johny Viau, eternal sideman

"You could have fooled me, saying it was the Year of the Sax. My datebook would tell you otherwise.

I had some good gigs in 2011 — I was in Europe for two months, and I had a good New Year's gig — but compared to the '80s and '90s, it's been getting worse and worse.

"Back then it was not unusual for me to play 29 times in 24 days. Now, it's once or twice a week. It's not just me, either. Everyone has

been getting fewer gigs overall. I can't wait for the Year of the Sax. I'll be sure and let you know when one comes along."

Ian Tordella, independent saxist

"In 2011, glam-sax came back, with indie-rock bands clamoring for more saxophone at varying levels of irony. And with bass saxophonist Colin Stetson collaborating with Feist and Bon Iver, the saxophone's street cred went way up. Also, check out Stetson's *New History Warfare Vol. II* for some mind-boggling stuff.

"But, for me, 2011 just meant a lot more sexysax studio work for cheesy commercials such as Godiva chocolate and Red Lobster."

Dave Castel De Oro, Robin Henkel Band

"I'm not sure why 2011 was specifically targeted as the Year of the Sax, but it seems like the resurgence of the sax solo in the pop song was the main reason. Bon Iver and Lady Gaga with Clarence Clemons's solo are two examples.

"I feel that the sax is one of the most versatile instruments in terms of its role in pop, jazz, and classical music. I grew up with music of the '70s and '80s, [and] Clarence Clemons's work with

Bruce Springsteen was seminal. More recent examples are Jeff Coffin's work with Béla Fleck and the late LeRoi Moore from the Dave Matthews Band. I also really like Steve Berlin's work with Los Lobos. And those are just some of the pop guys."

Johnny Ciampoli, West Coast Express, Cool Fever, Blues Invaders

"I find that sax seems to be popping up more, whether from the sexiness or the interest or the confusion of the horn itself. I think there was a lot more saxophone this year. But I don't think it ever went away. There was a time not too long ago when I was checking around online, and I found there are a lot of young horn players out there, and they're good.

"It's a curious instrument. It's got a lot of knobs. It looks like it's hard to play, like something

people want to master. I certainly would like to."

David Jackson, Euphoria Brass Band

"2011 saw the inclusion of saxophone solos in a number of high-profile releases by artists whose music is dominated by coursing computerized rhythms. Danceable, and maybe even cool? Sure, why not? But packed with living, breathing emotion? Not so much.


"The saxophone has always been one of the more expressive musical instruments, with its similarity to the human voice. The saxophone can express the highs and lows of human emotion as few other instruments can. It can portray the delight of a three-ring circus or the horror of a flop-house hotel."

The first time I heard the Los Campesinos song "By Your Hand," I was shocked. I mean, this is a band with a reputation for being twee (all the members go by first names only, and they usually spell their band name with an exclamation point), but here their singer was going on about "Kissing for hours with her hand in my trousers." Had this young, sweet-tempered Welsh indie-pop band suddenly turned into a bunch of horndogs — or, worse, into the kind of band that courts a frat-boy audience? I kept listening, and then main songwriter Gareth sang, "This is the crux/ She vomits down my rental tux." Ah, that's

more like it.

One of Los Campesinos' first singles was called "The International Tweexcore Underground," and the lyrics consist of an argument in which a K Records fan and a Black Flag loyalist try to find common ground. It's filled to the brim with relatively esoteric references to '80s and '90s punk and indie rock (surprising, considering that all seven members of Los Campesinos appear to be in their mid 20s), but the song has such irresist-

ible energy that it can easily appeal to young people whose knowledge of indie-rock history doesn't go back any further than Arcade Fire.

With all that energy, Los Campesinos have managed to win a growing following, despite their allegiance to the underground. They've even sold a song ("You! Me! Dancing") for a Budweiser ad. This is one of few indiepop bands that can rock hard enough for a



Budweiser ad but will always be more Belle & Sebastian than Bachman-Turner Overdrive.

The Features are indie rockers from Sparta, Tennessee, an eighth-grade startup born of small-town boredom. Coming of age in a cultural backwater of less than 5000 had its limitations, and a lot of the Features' songwriting focuses on what they want the most: a path out of lack and desperation. "They've given me a plastic hat, earphones, and a funny net for my hair/ I'm well prepared," sings Matthew Pelham. "Time comes when you have to choose/ an occupation you can use."

Pelham gives his characters an Eric Burdon "We gotta get outta this place" youth-shout full of promise and idealism: "One day we're gonna make a change/ We're gonna turn this mess around." You've heard this sentiment many times through the years, but what scraps are left for an indie rocker except to honor the past?

And honor it they do, but in ways that are not so new. The video for "Lions" has the Features performing on a rooftop, with Pelham using a blond Epiphone Casino guitar just like John Lennon played during the Fab Four's final gig on the rooftop of Apple Records. But

Pelham's guitar sounds like chaos (perfect!), and the organ is all Farfisa stabs and jolts, preserving at least a semblance of indie-ness. Fellow Tennesseans Kings of Leon picked them out of the indie rabble to be the first group signed to their Snakes and Serpents label, and critics see big things ahead for the Features. Based on the frenetics of the band's live shows, these critics predict that the small-venue low-dollar gigs will



soon be a thing of the past. Minus a solid jolt of creative independence, I disagree.

The Beautiful View and Kevin Martin also perform.



The Black Keys

Beginning with 2008's Attack & Release, each Black Keys record has taken their sound a step further away from its garage-rock origins. While some purists may decry the Danger Mouse-influenced shift to a more polished tapestry, the band's evolution and constant experimentation yields gorgeous results on El Camino.

"Everyone knows that a broken heart is blind," Dan Auerbach wails on the slowbuilding behemoth "Little Black Submarines."
The mangled guitar crescendo on the track speaks to a tension bubbling just beneath the surface of every Black Keys composition that only occasionally rises into the atmosphere.
You can argue that the

group has lost some of its raw, amateur charm, but you can't say a thing about their ever-present grit on songs such as "Lonely Boy" and "Run Right Back."

Through 11 concise tracks, Auerbach sings of waiting for something that will never come, yet finds some sort of hazy nobility in the endeavor. His heart-on-sleeve lyrics on the Nashville-based duo's seventh album are peremptory jabs of toxic nostalgia and longing. Time and again, the Black Keys pine for lost love under bluesy, up-tempo swells and the stellar drumming of Patrick Carney, yet they always manage to keep things fresh.

All Nerves, No Heart

A curious element of the Japanese horror genre seems to hang about the edges.

The Woman in Black

My first reaction to *The Woman* in *Black* was "all nerves, no heart." But I have a weakness for the sort of

nerve-stretching that the film employs. The sort that comes from a long shot that peers down a dim hallway in

an old house and strains at the darkness, waiting for something to emerge. The sort that mounts as a pale solicitor (Daniel Radcliffe) tries key after key in a locked door behind which he can hear a persistent thump and scrape. The sort that is almost glad when the ghost makes its appearance, because the waiting is the hardest part. So the

nerves part tended to obscure the heart part, which is perhaps as the makers intended.

With the benefit of hindsight

and daylight, my opinion has softened on both fronts. First, the nerves weren't as nervy as they might

have been, relying too heavily on big noises and jump scares and not enough on the creepy Victoriana surrounding our hero as he tries to sort out a dead widow's paperwork in a ruined house in the middle of a boggy marsh. The first time we got a glimpse of the alarmingly lifelike monkeys in the traditional see-no-evil, hear-no-

evil, speak-no-evil pose, I shivered at the thought of how the old saying might come into play. Alas, it didn't. And don't these people know that one creepy wind-up clown doll chiming away in the silence of an abandoned nursery is a good deal scarier than ten, all sounding off together?

And the heart was more heartful than I first realized. Radcliffe begins the film as a haunted man, having lost his wife in childbirth four years before. What follows is his journey toward peace, as opposed to the ghost's. (The role was a good choice as a first cinematic step away from *Harry Potter* — Radcliffe's fine features go taut with ease, and his eyes look haunted without even trying.) It's what keeps him going in the face of some grisly encounters in the haunted Eel Marsh



The Flowers of War

Now we know why they called it the Rape of Nanking. The Flowers of War tells the story of one American man's attempt to save a group of Chinese schoolgirls from rape at the hands of Japanese invaders in the late '30s. We are witnesses to attempted rape when the Japanese first break into the cathedral that is supposed to serve as the girls' sanctuary. We get actual rape when the Japanese catch a couple of the prostitutes who are also hiding out in the church. And we have the promise of rape when...well, I won't give it away. Rape, rape, rape, sometimes accompanied by sacred choral music.

Does it sound over the top? Perish the thought. There is no top. We're talking about bullets punching through a stained-glass window to save a girl from sexual assault. A paper-factory booby trap that sends rainbow-colored shreds soaring through the exploding air. A church with sassy whores in the basement and pious virgins in the attic. I could go on. I think the story might make a fine opera.

Christian Bale is our reluctant American hero, and his attempt at playing a drunken jerk in need of some humanity at the start of the story had me longing for the seedy, selfregarding charm of William Holden or Richard Burton. His role as White Savior is more believable — the Japanese are reluctant to harm a Westerner, and so he is the last best hope of the Chinese who beg for his protection. Converted by a mix of compassion (for the girls) and lust (for the whores), he impersonates a priest and sets about trying to repair a ruined truck on the church grounds so that he can smuggle his charges to safety.

For all the film's cheerful willingness to wallow in the extremes that wartime may bring, it does pause to dabble in humanity and nuance: a motherly prostitute here, a repentant schoolgirl there. Simple, powerful stuff. Plus, it looks amazing. So while I can see how some might condemn *The Flowers of War* as brutal, bathetic exploitation, I can't quite join in.

Elite Squad: The Enemy Within

"This may sound like a cliché in a Hollywood movie," rasps the narrator at the start of the Brazilian cop drama *Elite Squad*. The rest of the sentence

isn't important. What matters is the smackdown that the narrator, and the entire film, delivers to the American action-film hegemony.

Lt. Colonel Nascimento starts the film as the head of BOPE, Rio de Janeiro's version of a SWAT team (albeit one that uses a skull as an emblem). But after the squad's clampdown on a prison riot goes south — Nascimento wants to let the drug cartels kill each other, while the human-rights advocate who married his ex-wife (!) wants to negotiate peace — he finds himself booted upstairs to a desk job, monitoring wiretaps and running BOPE from above.

What follows is one man's war against the system, and the struggle is fascinating and visceral. Nascimento defines the system as "an articulation of loathsome interests," and it's those interests that make things interesting. The system isn't any one thing, controlled by one man, opposable by

force applied at one point. It's many things, controlled by many men — from politicians to cops to criminals — and force applied at one point may produce unintended effects in others.

A soldier who is used to defined missions with clear objectives must now consider motivations and weigh consequences, and guess what? Though his moral vision is clear, his judgment is not, and he makes serious mistakes.

The heavy use of narration makes it feel a little like film noir. The machinations — betrayals, conspiracies, manipulations — are worthy of any political thriller. The family dynamics, instead of being tossed in for the sake of adding depth to the protagonist, wind up being the central drama. But the feeling is pure police action.

Oscar doings: Friday begins the showing of this year's Oscar-nominated

short films, both animated and live action, at the Ken Cinema. Short films, at their best, have the same compact virtues as short stories, and here you have a gathering of contenders for that designation of "best."

The animated fare features a pleasing range of styles, though it's hard to imagine the prize going to anything besides Pixar's *La Luna. Cars 2* may have been a stumble, and *Brave* may look to be verging into the overcrowded field of Kickass Heroines, but the studio still understands the magic unique to animation. A little boy helps his father and grandfather to sweep the moon — what more do you need to know?

On the live-action side, *Tuba Atlantic* may wind up being one of the best things I see all year. A heartfelt mix of Wes Anderson's earnest whimsy and David Lynch's *The Straight Story*, set along the frozen

coast of Norway. I was overwhelmed.



Liberty Heights

Liberty Heights is one of my favorite movies, but most people have never seen or heard of it. Barry Levinson (Rain Man and Good Morning Vietnam) wrote, directed, and produced the movie. What I love most is its coming-of-age narrative, dry humor, and lead character Ben Kurtzman — though it offers much more than that. Besides my crush on the president's personal aide (Dule Hill), I am drawn into every episode's quick and brilliant dialogue; the chemistry among the characters; and a good dose of foreign and domestic policy issues that are still relevant.
