Brown Act Absent

Sweetwater Union school board meeting skips public comment

Chula Vista — The Sweetwater Union High School District board is beleaguered. Two trustees, Arlie Ricasa and Pearl Quiñones, and former superintendent Jesus Gandara are under indictment. Two additional boardmembers, John McCann and Jim Cartmill, are the subjects of a recall. And the district is financially floundering. Yet it appears the district board is attempting to limit or curtail public input.

For most of the past year, public comment has been held at the beginning of the board meetings; this allows parents, students, and district employees to go home after they have addressed the board with their concerns. As the district came under increasing criticism, the board moved public comment to the end of the meeting.

On June 11, the board took it one step further. When the time arrived for public comment, board president Pearl Quiñones ended the meeting. "This meeting is recessed," she announced, offering no further information.

In a June 12 interview, Peter Scheer, an attorney and executive director for the California First Amendment Coalition, commented,

"The Brown Act requires public comment at all board meetings." He said it's possible you might have to adjourn suddenly if a member were ill but expressed surprise that the board chose to "recess."

Shrinking Avocado

Water-access issues reduce fruit size Fallbrook — Since the first avocado trees were planted in 1912, Fallbrook's avocado industry has been thriving. The Fallbrook Chamber of Commerce estimates annual sales near \$26 million. However, due to water-access issues, the size of the average avocado is shrinking.

Growers from San Diego to San Louis Obispo are seeing a significant reduction in the size of the fruit. This year's harvest, though comparable to last year's in quantity, is yielding lower profits due to smaller fruit.

A carton of avocados is currently earning up to \$35, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Last year, prices reached as high as \$50 per carton. Local distributors are importing larger varieties from south of the border in hopes of pushing carton prices back up.

According to the California Avocado Commission, approximately 49 percent of the state's output is grown in San Diego County. With agricultural water rates in the county 30 times higher than in neighboring counties, however, local farmers pay a premium for water to be imported from upstate or the Colorado River.

Could Imperial Valley Become Owens Valley?

The San Diego County Water Authority is glowering at the north when it should be warily eyeing the east. The authority,

which wholesales water to county water districts, is spending piles of money on a lawsuit against the Los Angeles-based Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, which provides water to communities throughout the Southland. The San Diego County Water Authority, a customer of Metropolitan, thinks it is being overcharged.

But the county water authority should be pondering what is going on in Imperial Valley. In 2003, the authority and the Imperial Irrigation District cut a deal permitting San Diego to import water from the valley. That water now accounts for 27 percent of San Diego County usage.

Until just recently, only two members of the five-person Imperial Irrigation District board were skeptical of the 2003 arrangement. But one member has resigned suddenly, and the June 5 election results suggest that, after the final November runoff vote, the skeptics could have four or five of the five votes. Such a

new balance could significantly alter the thrust of the deal and force the San Diego County Water Authority to face reality about the availability of water and the need for conservation.



A report notes that lawyer David Osias has given Imperial Irrigation District bad advice.

That 2003 contract must be renegotiated or it will "shipwreck our economy," says James Hanks, a current member of the Imperial Irrigation District board. "There is a rebellion going on down here. The contract with San Diego is harming our agricultural industry" greatly because farmers say they can't get adequate water. "Our economic engine is

agriculture. Without that, we are dead."

Indeed, Imperial Valley citizens increasingly call their homeland "Owens Valley," the eastern California area whose water was filched by Los Angeles, as farmers were underpaid for land. One result was the infamous California Water Wars. A second result was the frightening windblown dust polluting the air after Owens Lake dried up.

If the contract with San Diego can't be altered to give relief to Imperial Valley, "it will bankrupt the [Imperial Irrigation District] and bankrupt Imperial Valley


and create another Owens Valley," says Steve Scaroni, a third-generation valley farmer.

One critical question is whether the State of California will handle rehabilitation of the Salton Sea. The matter has been considered at the trial and appellate court levels. The California Supreme Court won't take it up. The

Down, Down, Down for the Locos

he year Robert Cruz Ramos turned 15, he was shot in the head, according to his sister and his public defender. He started

drinking "to forget everything," and he started smoking marijuana daily. Around that time, his father disappeared from his life.

Ramos lived in a trailer park in Fallbrook, across the street from a shopping center with an Albertsons. The third of five children, he was born in Escondido but spent his first five years in Mexico before moving back across the border with his mother. He called his mother his best friend.

By the time Ramos was 16, he was snorting and smoking meth. One day after school, intoxicated, he threatened to "beat on" his mother. His mother's

boyfriend called authorities. That was the first time Ramos was arrested. The juvenile court ordered him to perform 40 hours of community service and get anger management counseling. And he was warned to stop associating with the Vario Fallbrook Locos gang.

His second arrest occurred when he was 17. Drunk, he threw cinder

blocks and chunks of concrete at his mom's mobile home and onto a car that belonged to his mother's boyfriend, as well as at the boyfriend himself and at his own little brother.

Although Ramos completed an outpatient treatment program, he continued to test positive for drugs. When he turned 18, the adult probation department declared, "Numerous local resources have been exhausted attempting to rehabilitate this young man to no avail."

After graduating from Ivy High School in 2010, he found work as a cook, a landscape laborer, a grocery store clerk; for a short time he had a job on a Christmas tree farm.

One night in January 2011, Ramos borrowed his mom's maroon Ford F-150 pickup truck to go buy some meth. It was after 11:00 p.m. when he and his friends, Sadboy and Gonzalo, returned. Traveling down Ammunition Road, they were passing the Albertsons shopping center when Sadboy spotted a man walking along the street.

Every night about 11:00 continued on page 44

Sic transit Todd

San Diego's third district councilman Todd Gloria, who ran unopposed in this

month's city election, nevertheless went all out to collect big campaign money from a host of special interests with business at city hall. From the first of this year through the end of May, the Hillcrest Democrat picked up \$51,033 in contributions. Much of

the cash came in to the Gloria campaign coffers after the city's March 8 candidate filing deadline, when it became virtually certain that Gloria would easily hold on to his seat. Money in that category came from such wired-in donors as Ace Parking's Keith Jones, a backer of ex-GOP independent mayoral candidate Nathan Fletcher; La Jolla attorney and lobbyist Matthew Peterson; Temecula resident Ginger Hitzke, president of San Marcos-based Hitzke Development; Constance Ziegaus of lobbyist Southwest Strategies; developer Perry Dealy,

a close associate of U-T San Diego publisher Doug Manchester; Kilroy Realty's **Steve Scott**; lobbyist Craig Benedetto of California Strategies; Yunmi Martin of Irvine Apartment Communities, Rancho Santa Margarita; and Morgan D. Oliver,

who was joined by five associates of his Oliver-McMillan Company, as well as assorted spouses and friends. (Hillary Crowe of Waipahu, Hawaii, who gave the maximum \$500 on May 30, was listed as the firm's "chief culture officer.")

The incumbent councilman put the funds to a variety of uses. Besides paying for election-night catering, the


> campaign paid \$10,000 to the Gemini Group, the campaignconsulting outfit run by **Jennifer** Tierney, which also handled District Attorney **Bonnie Duma**nis's failed mayoral bid. In addition, Gloria gave \$9500 to the San

Diego County Democratic Party. But he is hardly out of money. As of May 31, the reelection committee of the councilman, barred by law from seeking another term, still had \$87,451.90 of cash on hand, with only \$4592 in outstanding debt.





Shawn and I clinked glasses. "To dragons and swords," I said.

It was nice to have someone with whom to share my passion, but I was bummed it wasn't David.

"I wish you liked my shows," I said to my love as we shed our clothes and snuggled under the comforter on our bed.

"I wish I liked them, too," David said. And I knew he meant it. ■



San Onofre to Remain Offline Through Summer

It's official: both of the troubled nuclear generators at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station will remain offline throughout the summer, according to plant operator Southern California Edison.

Edison expects to present a safety plan to restart the plant's Unit 2 reactor, which was originally taken offline for routine maintenance, by the beginning of July, though gaining approval from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to resume operations will take at least another month. Plans for Unit 3, in a state of emergency shutdown after tubes in the plant's steam generating unit burst, leaking radiation into the atmosphere, will take longer to develop.

On another front, the website *Politico* earlier this week publicized a *list of allegations* brought forward by Rep. Ed Markey (D-MA) charging personnel intimidation and retaliation against whistle-blowers at Commission regional offices.

The accusations that safety concerns within the government monitoring agency are being suppressed mirror those *already* voiced by San Onofre workers. Despite reported fear of employer retaliation, the plant for at least the past two years has led the nation in substantiated safety claims.

Piling on, Judge Richard Posner in Chicago recently issued a statement critical of a "strange and dangerous" lack of oversight concerning security clearances at nuclear power facilities throughout the country.

"The safety of nuclear energy facilities cannot be taken for granted," wrote Posner, criticizing policies that did not involve the Commission in a process that resulted in the firing of two employees at a different plant after one failed a drug and alcohol test and another was found to be lying about his alcohol abuse.

Finally, nuclear power activists with San Onofre Safety and other groups penned a letter this week to Commission chairman Gregory Jaczko bemoaning the recent discovery of flaws in San Onofre's diesel backup generators that could have led to their inadvertent shutdown in the event of an earthquake, which in turn could have caused a nuclear meltdown.

Last year, the Reader **spoke with nuclear expert/muckraking journalist Greg Palast**, who expressed little faith in the ability of the generators to function properly even if the earthquake sensors were operating properly. He pointed to a test of a similar backup system at the dismantled Shoreham Nuclear Power Plant in New York, in which all three of the backup

STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

Heymatt:

My mother stopped by to see my new apartment and she said, "There's not enough room here to swing a cat." I'll admit the place is sort of cozy, but why would anyone want to swing a cat in it? I've heard the expression before, so it's not something my mom just made up. Can you find out where the expression came from and why anybody would want to swing a cat in the first place?

Historically, cats have had their ups and downs. In ancient Egypt they were worshipped, in the Middle Ages and later they were feared and hated. Today we feed them beef tips in wine sauce out of crystal compotes. So cat-swinging is at least a possibility. As for the expression, well known by the mid-1600s, the most common explanation you'll hear is

that "cat" refers to the cat-o-nine-tails that the British Navy used to discipline crew members. The crew cabin was too small to properly swing the cats for maximum effect, says this crowd of word wizards. No, no, say the nonbelievers. The British Navy always flailed the cat on deck, with the bad guy tied to the mast, so all crew members assembled to watch could benefit from this teachable moment. And Britain didn't start doing this until after the expression was known.

Further research into the checkered history of the cat revealed that hunters, at the end of the day, would retire to the nearest ale house and swing cats. Often the animals were placed in bags and swung over a ceiling beam, then perhaps shot at. Other times, two cats would be tied together with a rope; then the hunter would attempt to fling the cats over a beam, one cat on each side. Much fun, apparently, for a crowd that had just spent the day killing Bambi and bunnies. The saloon cat games are actually referred to in literature of the times: *David Copperfield* and one work of Shakespeare. Which story you believe seems to depend on how strongly you think the Navy tale is pure bunk.

Hey Matt:

I always like looking at the ground while walking to find money, roaches, etc. I noticed on O.B. pier that about every five feet or so a marble is embedded in the cement. Why is this?

This I think is a perfect O.B. question with the perfect O.B. answer. For leads, we went to (Ms.) Denny Knox, exec director of the O.B. MainStreet Association, and (Mr.) Pat James, chair of the O.B. Historical Society. No one knows, they say. It's a mystery, despite attempts to unmask the perp. But, of course, there are plenty of tales. Denny Knox keeps an infor-

The Arco (and the Thrifty) brand is owned by the dreaded BP (British Petroleum), the same BP responsible for the oil-rig disaster in the Gulf of Mexico. Well, "was" owned. On the hook for all costs related to the physical, economic, and public-image rehab of the Gulf area, BP has sold about 250 of its many Arco stations in Southern California to Texas refiner Tesoro. Expect Tesoro's USA Gasoline in Arco's place. It's complicated; there might be more on the horizon.

The front windows of the bocadillo shop were propped wide open; the static June humidity surrounded us. The cobblestone streets between tightly nestled three-story

vistas looked romantic, even in the middle of the day. The southern coast of Spain was beautiful this time of year, a little slice of heaven viewed from a barstool. The waitress was young, and her face had the strong angular planes that make the Spanish some of the most beautiful people I have ever seen. She bounced back and forth among the patrons sitting around the heavy oak-and-brass bar, filling glasses, taking orders, and politely conversing. My

best friend and I were visiting for the summer, taking Spanish courses at an academy in both Madrid and El Puerto de Santa Maria.

"What is this?" I asked my friend, pointing to a topping listed on the menu. "I have no idea," she responded. We quickly took out our electronic dictionaries. No luck. I'm a vegetarian, which can be challenging when traveling abroad. So we asked the waitress if she could explain.

"¿Qué es eso?"

She tilted her head and replied with empathy, as if she already knew we wouldn't be able to understand her. And she was right. By the end of her explanation, I wasn't even sure if it was edible. But she was sweet, and clearly wanted to help me with this problem. So she took a paper from her pad and began to draw. I'm not going to build the suspense here, like it was some kind of mystical revelation that I experienced inside this sandwich café. It was espárragos, something we should have been able to figure out, but if you've ever studied abroad, you can imagine that perhaps we were a little off our game from the previous night out.

I had never eaten an asparagus sandwich, but it was delicious. Epiphanies over condiments and sandwich toppings are not something to celebrate. What is interesting, however, is the universal humor found in phallic drawings. Because I won't ever forget the look on that woman's face as she realized she was drawing a penis in a sandwich. She looked at me, and I looked at her. I looked at my best friend, and she looked at the waitress. And at the exact same time, we all started to laugh.

> Years later this would happen again, this time in the classroom of a 7th grade Korean academy. My student was desperately searching for a word to describe the type of gun his fictional character would carry in his narrative. He described what it looked like, but I'm not exactly an encyclopedia on weaponry. So I told him to draw it. Needless to say, the outcome was very similar to the experience I had many summers ago in Spain. When he put his pencil down,

he paused and kind of stared at it like he had created a monster. I leaned over his shoulder to see, and I knew exactly what to say.

"Oh, you mean a rocket launcher." "Yeah, yeah, that's it!"

He and I held each other's gaze for a second longer and laughed together at what we both knew not to say. Again, the penis had found itself in the middle of a cultural exchange. Deeper than learning the names of foreign cities and customary foods, this was the type of feeling you only get from retelling stories you've told a million times with your best friend late at night; stories that are funny only because you're sharing them with someone you love. And I was having this moment with a 14-year-old Korean student.

It's nice to think that if I were trapped in a holding cell, being interrogated by Al Qaeda over nuclear warhead secrets sold to Iran, a car battery clamped to my nipples, that perhaps if I drew something that looked like a pair of testicles and a penis, that maybe my interrogator and I could share a laugh or two and realize that we're not so different after all. Maybe they do things a little bit differently than I do, but heck, if we can agree that a sketch of a nuclear warhead looks a little phallic, and that this is hilarious...maybe there's hope for us after all.





ant to drive in a race on a NASCAR track? No experience needed, no special license required. Want to

Presenting the 24 Hours of LeMons, which is not the well-known 24 Hours of Le Mans, a Frenchy sports-car race famous enough so you've heard of it, but an American born and bred race that lasts 14 to 24 hours with the requirement that no car cost more than \$500. The term *car* has a generous interpretation that includes 40-year-old beaters that have boats, missiles, and campers welded to their roofs. The team that has driven their car the most laps is hauled before unwashed scum to receive a cash prize, \$500, sometimes paid in nickels, sometimes thrown at your windshield.

The 24 Hours of LeMons was founded in 2006 by Jay Lamm, a Bay Area automotive journalist who calls his race "a waste of time." The most prestigious prize is not the most-laps winner, but winner of the Index of Effluency, which is a punk on the Frenchy 24 Hours of Le Mans Index of Thermal Efficiency. There, the prize is awarded by way of a formula that includes weight of oil, water, spares, average speed, and energy in liters of fuel per 100 km. Who knows why? — it's France. Here, the prize is called the Index of Effluency and is best explained by Murilee Martin, who writes for Car and Driver. Martin says, "Forty-year-old cars have an edge on the Index of Effluency, LeMons racing's top prize. Chrysler products also have an edge. And, of course, French cars have a huge edge on the IOE. When you race a car that's simultaneously 40 years old, a Chrysler, and French..."

Introducing Escondido homeboy and 40-year-old Chrysler French car enthusiast, Mike "Spank" Spangler. He's 42, married with one child, and a hero on the tour, having won the Index of Effluency four times. Spank taught English at San Marcos High School and raced bicycles, but that was before he understood his true calling. I called on a hot Tuesday morning. Follows is some of what he said.

"The [race] format is typically daylight hours. The circus starts on Friday around noon when tech inspections opens. They're very serious about safety; all safety items are budget exempt. You go through safety tech and then roll a few feet forward and that's where you go through B.S. Inspection. You have to prove you've only spent \$500 on your car. Of course, there's cheating. Part of the B.S. inspection is making a bribe. You bribe your way through.

"Jay Lamm and the supreme court judges are automotive journalists, so they know cars. When you have a BMW or a Miata with a turbo charger on it, lining up to somebody's 1982 Ford Escort, both cost \$500, yeah, but one of them is clearly faster than the other. So, they will class them as A, B, or C. It's purely arbitrary. There are races for each class. Class A cars, generally, are the overall winners.

"There's a drivers' meeting on Saturday, typically 9 or 10 o'clock. Drivers will take to the track at 10:30. You drive all the way to sundown, which, depending on the time of year, could be 4, 5, 6, 7 o'clock at night. And then all night Saturday is the party in the pits. There's no alcohol allowed while the track is hot. People think, 'Oh, I'm going to go get wasted and drive.' Absolutely not. LeMons is *very* serious about safety.

"But, as soon as the track goes cold Saturday night, people let loose. There are people who sleep at the track, who tent it, RV it, a few who choose to go to hotels, but Saturday night is the party. Some teams supply food or alcohol or maybe bring a live band.

"Everybody is wrenching on their car, frantically trying to get it back together. There are a lot of broken motors and things breaking in a manner you never thought possible. Fixing what needs to be fixed. The race resumes again at 9 a.m. and ends mid-afternoon on Sunday.

"However, there are occasional true 24-hour events. The event coming up on June 30 at Buttonwillow is a true 24-hour race. It's a whole different animal; it actually turns some competitors away because there isn't the partying. They're grueling. It's tough, and sometimes if the car breaks during a true 24-hour event, people will just load their trailer and go home. Instead of 14 to 16 hours, they actually race 24 hours. It's tough. It really is. You're up all night, you have teams of four to eight drivers you've got to manage, you have to..."



Another summer, another round of broken patio umbrellas. I'm looking into something the kids can't destroy, which means it has to be something they can't reach. Maybe shade sails.

"We've been around for 15 years," said Dan Mezich, owner of SoCal Shade Sails in Encinitas (760-535-1966, *sunshade-shadesails. com*), "and demand has really grown over the past five years. The sails have a dynamic look — ours come in 25 colors, and they do not fade. They're less expensive

than traditional wood patio covers; I would say our residential price range is \$3000 to \$50,000.

And they provide a lot more shade — 90 to 97 percent UV protection."

To make his custom sails, Mezich uses
"a polyethylene fabric imported from Australia.
But we actually make the sails locally, so our turnaround time is faster than some other companies. The sails come with stainless steel mounting hardware and steel cabling along the perimeter. It's very easy to clean — just hose it off. And it has a ten-year warranty. Plus, we offer a one-year installation warranty."

"We'll help with the design," assured Mezich. "Most people like the look of shade sails but have a hard time figuring out connection points. It's got to be connected properly or it will fail. I'm a general contractor, so I know where we can put the brackets. We come over to help. We offer a 3D sketch so that customers can see how the sails will look. The sketch costs \$200, and that is then applied toward the purchase price. For the sail itself, we charge by the linear foot."

Next, I spoke with Mike Ruder, owner of DMR Shade (714-379-0011). Ruder is a preferred installer for Shadesails.com, and he services San Diego County. "Each job is designed to the customer's taste," he began. "We offer ready-made sails in a variety of shapes and sizes; those come with a two-year fabric warranty and offer 65 to 75 percent UV protection, depending on the color. Or we offer custom-made sails with a ten-year warranty; those offer 75 to 95 percent UV protection. The sails are made from a high-density polyethylene fabric that is reinforced along the perimeter. The custom sails also have either stainless steel cabling or seatbelt-style webbed material along the edge."

Installation is the real trick, said Ruder. "They have to be put under the right amount of tension. We stretch the edges, and that puts the entire sail under tension. That minimizes

movement, which in turn prevents premature fabric wear. If sails are tensioned properly, they will withstand a Class C wind load — that's 85 miles per hour. We usually use the customer's building as an anchor point, and we also usually set a post into the ground or affix it to an existing concrete slab. If you're using the

ready-made sails [\$59.95-\$980, depending on size], we might be able to use whatever the customer has available — say, a tree."

Costs vary, depending on the project, said Ruder. "For residential setups, I've done projects ranging from \$600 to \$40,000. With today's technology, people can email me photos or a site plan, and I can work up a design to get them the best coverage within their budget. Sometimes, I can pop

in three or four sails and maybe a post or two, using the home as an anchor point, and come in about a third cheaper than a wood or aluminum patio covering."

Finally, I talked to Michael Moran at Moran Canvas in La Mesa (619-462-7778, morancanvas.com). "We do custom sails in any color. If you do your own measurements, you can just tell us over the phone. Or you can have us come out and do a consultation at no charge. Installation is extra. The sails are made from a polypropylene-polyethylene mesh, and they're very durable," he assured me. "You can expect to see a 14- to 15-year lifespan. And they're user-friendly — they don't need maintenance, and they wash clean in a mild rain."

Speaking of rain, Moran noted that the sails "need to be installed with some slope, because even though they are a shade material, some water will come through" if it sits on the surface. "We recommend two inches of slope for every foot of sail. We charge \$15 a perimeter-foot for fabrication. On the low end, sails plus installation could cost \$1500 to \$2000. Of course, last year we did an installation at High Tech High in Chula Vista, and it ran to \$250,000."

Finally, said Moran, "We give a full warranty of ten years on both fabric and installation. A good warranty is important. We repair other shade sails all the time — people buy them online, and they go to pieces in a year or two. Then the owner has to take it in and get it resewn, and that can be expensive."

North Park:

No one is dancing. You were warned, but it still doesn't look right. At Sunset Temple, there's a hip young local band, Little Deadman, and an all-ages crowd. Some 200-plus people. There are a few seating areas created with white vinyl cubes, some high bar stools, and a couple of throne-like chairs (all occupied) near the walls. Much leaning takes place. Those jammed up against the stage bob their heads. Otherwise, nobody moves.

"Don't expect a lot of dancing," Stacy told you an hour ago, over pork-belly tacos at El Take It Easy.

A freelance photographer who seems to know everyone in this town, Stacy often tweets photographs of the hip places she goes and the people who inhabit her world. When she invited you to an evening of music for the final night of Sezio's Four Day Weekend festival, you were psyched. Headed to a music festival in North Park, you figured jeans and heels would be a safe choice, but then Stacy and her friend Natalie, also a photographer, showed up at El Take It Easy in jeans, hoodies, and sneakers. At one point, Stacy referred to her shirt as a "luxurious two-dollar tank top."

The shoe of choice in this crowd is the classic Chuck Taylor low-top; the print of choice is plaid. The girls are mostly Chloë Sevigny cool, in dresses or shorts and boxy men's blazers. On the guys, jeans and beards complete a skater-meets-lumberjack look.

"There's a guy in overalls," Natalie says.

"He roasts his own coffee," Stacy says. "He has personally delivered coffee to me."

This doesn't surprise you. Stacy and Natalie have friends all over the place. At El Take It Easy, Natalie said she knows the guy who made the shelf behind the bar where the glasses hang. When you first walked into this venue, both women laughed at the video montage playing over the stage — their friends made it. Before the show began, they

mentioned that they know the DJ and the photographer running around taking official event photos. They also know the organizers.

Up near the front of the stage, you make a friend, a 50-year-old woman named Tori. She wears a knee-length dress, dark leggings, ballet flats, and a newsboy cap. She's here with her 13-year-old daughter, Bella, who won the tickets on 94/9 FM.

Tori tells you that if she had to choose the coolest person here, she'd pick "any of the guys from Sezio, because they're super artistic."

You wonder who you would've become if you'd had a mom like Tori. But as cool as she seems, Bella looks as if she'd rather have given the second ticket to her best friend. Bella's wearing flats and a little dress, too. She doesn't take her eyes off the band's guitar player, Anthony Levas.

"He's nice to everybody," she says, "and he's really cool."

After Little Deadman's set is over, the over-21s swarm to the bar at the back of the room, where cute girls with platinum-blond pixie cuts serve drinks in plastic cups. The under-21s sit on the floor and pull out their smartphones. Outside, the MIHO Gastrotruck is parked by the curb. A group of under-21s count their pooled money. They check out the menu to see what they can afford.

Cigarette-smokers light up a polite distance from the venue's door.

Stacy introduces you to Sezio's Zack Nielsen, a clean-shaven guy who, from the looks of him, could as easily work on Wall Street as run a nonprofit arts organization. He estimates that 25 percent of tonight's crowd is under the age of 21. Many of Sezio's interns are high-school kids, he says. Even

familiarity.

Before he turns to chat with the teacher, Nielsen says he loves the people that surround him. "No one cares about being cool."

Hannah, a 16-yearold collage-and-mixedmedia artist from High

though teens are major players in the musicbuying market, there are few all-ages venues where they can hang out and listen to music. So he tries to accommodate them when he can.

A teacher from High Tech High walks up in sweats and a T-shirt. The money-counting kids in front of the gastrotruck greet him with Tech High, admits that she *does* care. She says "cool" is no accident. You just have to know how to do it right. For girls, it can go in two different directions.

"Girls can look nice and be cool," she says, "or they can look gross and be cool."

After a pause, she explains: "It's a mix of looking nice enough, but

grungy enough."

Hannah wears an ornate, brocade-looking black-on-black top, jeans, and ballet flats. There is pink in her pixie cut. Long feather earrings dangle. She picked out this outfit a couple of days before the show. At the last minute, she almost changed her mind.

"I was going to freak out about it," she says. "But then I just decided to wear what I was going to wear."

Gaslamp: "There's a variety of music and culture...and brown people!"

It's Thursday in the Gaslamp, the night of the Good Foot. The entrance to the Red C Lounge descends from Fifth Avenue and spits you right onto the dance floor. You arrive at 10:30 p.m. or

so, trailing along behind Omar, aka Roxrite, and Marisol. They're greeted with hugs and handshakes from the group of guys hanging around near the booth where DJ Mane One spins.

On the other side of the 10-x-14-foot dance floor, the bar stretches back into a darkness that separates it from the front of the house. A few people seated on bar stools hunch over their drinks. Side by side, Marisol and Omar look mismatched — they're the same height, but she's wearing a pair of sexy stilettos that make her

nearly a head taller. Marisol's cobalt-blue backless shirt, eyelashes for days, and sleek black hair give her a glamorous sheen. Omar exudes a more casual vibe in sneakers, baggy jeans, and snapback.

It would never be obvious to an onlooker, but Omar is the star. Last November in Moscow, Russia, he won the title of World Champion at the Red Bull BC One competition, known as the Super Bowl of breakdancing. It was his third attempt; at 29, he's the

oldest winner to date.

Everything you learn about breakdancing tonight, you'll learn from Marisol. Omar is

Within ten minutes of your arrival, the place has filled up. A circle forms on the dance floor. You and Marisol sit at the one tall bar

table set against the wall, where you are outside the circle but can still see into its center. A guy in a red hat starts doing his toprock, a sort of pre-dance that serves as both a warmup and a display of personal style. Marisol says he's from the Rock So Fresh crew. Also here tonight are members of Bang Uh Rang, from South San Diego; Epic Styles, a crew out of Mira Mesa; and Omar's crew, Renegades. Omar sways at the edge of the circle, his hands in the pockets

His body creates all kinds of freakish, contortionist shapes, and then, mid-move, he freezes briefly. Again and again. You've seen videos of him dancing on his website, but this is different. In person, the effect is like a series of photographic stills, set to the tune of Bo Diddley's "Bite Me."

When Roxrite returns to the edge of the circle, KidRiz nods at him. Roxrite nods back. He turns to watch the guy everyone calls Brooklyn out on the

In the back, past the tables crowded with riders and social-club members, the DJ plays James Brown. The dance floor pulses with a mass of writhing bodies.

Storm takes you under her wing. She introduces you to people with names like Fetiish ("two i's"), Sweet Pea, and Classy; some are women who belong to social clubs not affiliated with any particular motorcycle club. Storm provides answers for the things you don't understand.

"Social clubs? I call 'em groupies with a vest," she says. "Like cheerleaders with pompoms."

Storm explains the rules of respect with regard to the colors, which cannot be covered up by backpacks or jackets or hugs. To lay your colors down could result in a fine, if they're picked up by someone from another club. Later, Senior will tell you, "I've seen it as high as \$1000."

When Storm turns away for a second, you meet some of the people she hasn't already preapproved. Many of them want to talk about the fundraisers their clubs have held (blanket drives and so on), and to wax poetic about the beauty of belonging to a motorcycle club.

The Big Noise: The Free Speech Fight of 1912, Part Five

Around noon on March 31, 1912, a crier waved a red banner down Fifth Street. "The public is invited to Sev-

enth and B Streets
by at 2:30," the banner
Jeff announced, "to attend
Smith the funeral of Michael
Hoey, who died in the
cause of Free Speech."

A large man chased the crier down, hooked him around the neck, and slammed him to the pavement. Then the man loaded his mouth with saliva and spit on the "emblem of anarchy."

At 2:30, the doors opened at Johnson, Connell, & Saum's Mortuary. Harry

Daggett emerged first. He wore a frayed, three-piece suit and hoisted a red flag. Behind him came 20 IWW "Wobblies." As six men carried Hoey's casket two blocks from the mortuary to the vacant lot at Seventh and B, angry onlookers assembled on the sidewalks.

"That's how contemptible they are," said a sailor from the USS *Maryland*, "using the sanctity of death to protect them."

"Too cowardly otherwise," added another.

When the cortege reached the vacant lot, free-speech supporters awaited them. Daggett stepped to the side.

"Get the fellow with the red flag," someone shouted. "That's too much!"

Detective Harvey Shepherd raised a hand: "Don't interrupt the service," he said. "I'll get him."


At the station, Daggett told police

he didn't know what the flag meant. He'd become the "color bearer" because Mike Hoey was his friend "and a good man." Asked if he was a Wobbly, Daggett



said no, but he believed in most of their principles and would let better minds than his plan solutions. When Daggett left the station, wrote the *Union*, he had to run a gauntlet of "hisses, hoots, and jeers from the crowd outside."

Gray-haired Michael Hoey was an IWW veteran of free-speech fights in Spokane and Fresno. Arrested during the first week of protests in San Diego, Hoey spent 40 days in city jail. Although they denied it, Hoey swore that three officers — rookie patrolman Irwin, in particular - clubbed and kicked him repeatedly in the groin. Cramped with over 100 prisoners in a cell built for 60, Hoey had to sleep on a cement floor and eat inedible food. "When I asked Dr. Claude Magee [the police surgeon] for a laxative, he gave me an emetic, which caused such violent vomiting that I became seriously ill."

On March 21, Magee sent Hoey, a man in his mid-60s, in an ambulance to Agnew Hospital with a note: the patient is in "practically normal condition," but suffers from an old rupture. Seven days later, Hoey died.

A coroner's jury diagnosed bronchial pneumonia and found "no evidence of violence."

Dr. Deville of Agnew Hospital disagreed. Hoey died from unsanitary conditions at the jail, Deville told the *San Diego Sun*, and "police brutality."

On March 31, Hoey's gaunt body lay stretched across a cloth-covered catafalque at the vacant lot. Laura Payne Emerson, IWW member and wife of a local jeweler, gave a eulogy. Hoey, she said, was "an offering on the altar of free speech." She quoted him: "I have nothing to give but myself, and life is not worth living when all liberty is gone." In the

last two months, she concluded, the test of an illegal ordinance had swelled into "threats of vengeance, from quarters unexpected."

During Hoey's days behind bars, violence by police and San Diegans escalated from denial of wrongdoing to overt, "patriotic" action.

"Although San Diego had less to fear from the Wobblies than either Spokane or Fresno," writes Melvyn Dubofsky, "it nevertheless acted more savagely to repress free speech.... No brutality proved beyond the imagination of San Diego's 'good citizens."

On March 18, the Union reported that police stopped "a gang of dynamiters whose sinister plots included the wrecking of San Diego buildings and industrial plants." Police chief Keno Wilson said that A.E. Hawley, owner of a gun store in Santa Ana, couldn't account for

a half-ton of dynamite stored in a barn. At first, police assumed Hawley was pro-IWW, since he'd sent a dollar "to buy the boys in the San Diego jail tobacco." But he denied any affiliation with the Wobblies and with Jack Whyte, the alleged ringleader.

Whyte became notorious for telling the First Baptist Church men's club that he recognized no flag, no law, no constitution, and did not believe in God or any country.

Two days later, Councilman Dodson announced that the dynamite hadn't disappeared, after all. An inventory erred when weighing the load.

Judge Sloane sentenced Whyte anyway: six months and a \$300 fine for conspiracy. At his trial, Whyte exploded: "The indictment is a lie.... You cowards throw the blame upon the people, but I know who is to blame and I name them: it is [Joseph]

Spreckels and his partners in business, and the court is the lackey of that class, defending the property of that class against the advancing horde of starving American workers."

Although the dynamite scare was unfounded, the original announcement prompted formation of the Citizens Committee of 1000. They volunteered to help police protect the city and take "undesirable characters to the county line and assist them northward, by more or less impelling force."

The *Union* applauded giving protesters the "most effective assistance" out of town. What the *Union* didn't say: the "Vigilance Committee" made public what had been done in private from the start.

The March 22 Incident The city and county jails held over 250 inmates. On March 22, Chief Wilson announced that, from now on, police would make "selective arrests" — just leaders of the movement — and deport those in jail to the city limits.

On March 23, rumors spread that the night before, several trucks had driven prisoners to the train station at Sorrento Valley. Unmasked civilians, calling themselves the new Vigilance Committee, ordered handcuffed captives to form a single line. What followed was a "going-away party." Vigilantes beat the men with clubs and axe handles, then told them to walk to Orange County.

Chief Wilson denied knowledge of the incident. The *Union* said he "was inclined to laugh" at the allegation. Chief of Detectives Myers, labeled a "Cossack" by protesters, said that, for all he knew, the prisoners "merely started on their way."

Word spread: the



March 22 incident became a rallying cry. Stanley M. Gue, secretary of IWW Local 13, wrote in the Industrial Worker: "The day for appeals has gone. The time has come when we can tell you the true story of our predicament with all its ghastly trimmings."

Since the local press reported only denials, Gue urged workers to "tell the story day and night. Smear the misery of those boys in jail, the misery of our class over everything." He concluded with a call to arms: "Come to San Diego a hundred thousand strong. Roads into San Diego are guarded by armed deputies."

Toward the end of March, the city instituted a new, "move on" ordinance: police could break up any gathering anywhere, busting heads if necessary.

On March 29, in front of his bookstore at Seventh and D, Grant Webster watched 18 policemen club Thomas Kilwallen for refusing to move on. Every time he tried to escape, they pounded him again. Webster heard one officer say, "We'll kill one of you damned anarchists yet." The sight reminded Webster "of the time I saw 16 small boys worrying a defenseless dog."

San Diegans against the IWW began wearing small American flags on their lapels. A flag crimped in the center identified a vigilante. People downtown got used to hearing the "riot call." A fire-whistle at Kettner and Broadway made five blasts, paused, then made five more: a signal that the Committee of 1000 must assemble.

On April 2, a fight broke out at Fourth and E. Several men "roughly handled" Patrolman Langford. He was unarmed and not in uniform. Sailors from the USS *Maryland*, and the police — "who were not slow in using their clubs" — stopped the free-for-all.

The next day Chief

Wilson decried the attack on Langford: thus far, he told the Sun, police have been "too lenient." The IWW will "get all that is coming to them from now

On April 4, the Indus*trial Worker* questioned the IWW's "soft," nonviolent tactics in San Diego for the first time. When Wilson began shipping prisoners to the county line, the directaction approach — stuff the jails and stop the system became ineffective. Instead of passive resistance, the Worker demanded an eye for an eye: "Take warning [Police Superintendent] Sehon, Wilson, [District Attorney] Utley — take heed members of the 'vigilance committee.' Your names will be broadcast. Reparation will be exacted! He laughs best who laughs

That same day, the "riot call" blasted. Between 90 and 100 IWW's had hopped a train at Santa Ana headed for San Diego. District Attorney Utley and Chief Wilson called a "consultation" at Utley's office. Among those attending: Sehon, Chamber of Commerce Secretary Choate, Chief of Detectives Myers, banker Julius Wangenheim, and Francis Bierman, a Union reporter — later alleged by Emma Goldman to be a ringleader of the vigilantes, and by others as Joseph Spreckels's point man.

The committee decided to deputize as many people as they could and stop the train at the county line. Secretary Choate rounded up San Diegans "willing to let business go and serve as deputies."

Utley downplayed the conference. "There is nothing for publication at this time," he told reporters. But what may have come out of it was an all-out declaration of war against the Wobblies' invasion.

That afternoon 30 prisoners vanished from jail. Some said police turned them over to a

citizens' committee for "re-education" at Sorrento Valley.

An estimated 45 newly deputized constables rode on horseback to San Onofre. Over 100 other San Diegans headed north in cars or on the 3:00 train. They packed blankets and provisions for several days and vowed "inspirational lessons in patriotism."

The night before, a posse had stopped the Santa Fe at the county line. They ordered 72 "vagrants" down from the freight cars and beat them. In the morning, bragging about the "fun" they were having, vigilantes herded their captives across the county line. Three couldn't walk. The official word: two tripped when hopping down from the train; the third broke his leg when he slipped on tracks and fell off a bridge.

Charles Hanson, a veteran of three free-speech fights, was the third. He told the *Industrial Worker* that vigilantes forced him to kiss the flag ("You son of a bitch, come on, kiss it, God damn you!") and run a gauntlet through over 100 men — two lines, 50 each — armed with whips, clubs, and broken whiskey bottles. He didn't get far when a wagon spoke shattered his kneecap. As he bled in the dust, Hanson watched a "cowardly and inhuman cracking of heads."

At 1:00 a.m. on April 5, a freight train from Los Angeles reached the county line. On board were over 100 men, half under 21. The train slowed to an unscheduled halt. Four hundred "citizens" — men, and some women — lined both sides of the tracks. Some carried lanterns. Many sported constables' badges and all wrapped a white handkerchief around the left elbow: the sign of a vigilante.

Albert Tucker was one of the "free travelers" on the train. "The moon was shining dimly through the clouds," he recalled, "and I could see pick handles,

wagon spokes, and every kind of club imaginable swinging from the wrists of all of them."

He also saw rifles, aimed at the Wobblies, and "black snakes" — 18-inch fire hoses filled with sand at one end, tacks at the other. A black snake left no marks.

"We were ordered to unload," Tucker recalled, "and we refused. Then they closed around the flat car we were on and began clubbing and knocking and pulling men off by their heels."

A half-hour later, hundreds of "drunk and hollering and cursing" vigilantes marched "bruised and bleeding" captives singlefile to a nearby cattle corral. Inside, the men had to keep moving in a circle with their hands over their heads. Those who fell were beaten. Anyone acting like a leader got "an extra beating." Vigilantes dragged unconscious Wobblies out of the corral and into the darkness. Rifle fire chased those who tried to flee. "Afterwards," says Tucker, "there was a lot of our men unaccounted for and never have been heard from since."

"They kilt two Wobs," recalled "Codger" Bill Lewis, "and ya don't know how many more bodies they mighta' dumped in the desert for the coyotes."

Wobblies considered themselves rough customers able to sing in the face of hardship. None sang that

At dawn, constables opened the corral gate and released four or five prisoners at a time. They marched up the tracks and stopped before a mob of vigilantes. Each prisoner had to kneel, kiss the American flag, and sing the "Star Spangled Banner." If someone refused, or even looked like he might not cooperate, black snakes beat him senseless.

Then, Tucker says, each had to "run a gauntlet of 106 men, every one of which was striking at us as hard as they could."

As he watched the man before him run, fall, and crawl through two rows of flying handles, Tucker noticed that the clubbers were headhunters: whenever a man raised his head, vigilantes took dead aim.

When Tucker ran the gauntlet, he kept his head low. He emerged blackand-blue. As he hobbled to the county line he bled from "a dozen" wounds and vowed: "If I ever take part in another [free-speech fight], it will be with machine guns and aerial bombs. There must be a better way of fighting and better results."

That night, the war continued in town. Unmasked members of the citizen's committee kidnapped Abraham Sauer, editor of the pro-Free Speech San Diego *Herald.* They drove him to East County, put a noose around his neck, and told him never to return — or identify them.

Sauer did return. He wrote in the Herald: "The personnel of the vigilantes represent not only merchants and bankers, but church members and bartenders." He also named the chamber of commerce, the real-estate board, the press, public utilities, "as well as members of the grand jury."

Sauer never took legal action or named names.

That morning, while the edition was still being printed, 30 vigilantes burst into the printer's shop and smashed the galleys. From that point on, Sauer smuggled the weekly Herald from Los Angeles and distributed it on the sly.

Union editorials praised the vigilantes: "If this action be lawlessness, make the most of it" (April 7); "These anarchists have gone far enough...hereafter they will not only be carried to the county line and dumped there, we intend to leave our mark on them... so that the outside world

may know that they have been to San Diego" (April

Stumpy, the correspondent for Solidarity, wrote in reply: "The jails are full, but they seem to think there is plenty of room in the cemetery." ■ — Jeff Smith



case is now back at the superior court level, and court watchers think the final decision may let the state off the hook.

The sea is shrinking every year, and the transfer of water to San Diego cuts off agricultural runoff that should replenish it. The sea's shrinkage exposes mud- and salt flats, whose fine particulates and pesticide residues are carried aloft by the wind and distributed over the region. The result is "increasing numbers of kids going to hospitals for asthma," among other health woes, says Stuart Hurlbert, professor emeritus of biology at San Diego State. The Salton Sea could be Owens Lake redux.

Hurlbert thinks the state will gladly back out of its obligation. That would leave the Salton Sea rehabilitation job largely to the Imperial Irrigation District, which can't afford it. Last year, the district hired Charles DuMars, a New Mexico expert in water law, to study the situation. "If the state fails to cover the environmental and social costs to the Imperial Valley as a result of the decline in the Salton Sea," DuMars wrote, the partners in the big water transfer, including San Diego, "must shoulder that additional burden."

Wrote DuMars, "Failure to properly address the Salton Sea issues could contribute to the destruction of the health, quality of life, and economic base of the valley." Hurlbert says the rehabilitation could be done cheaply if the water stayed in the valley.

Hanks belongs to the 54950 Commission, an activist group that rides herd on local government. The commission recently came out with a report concluding that the irrigation district "has come to be governed under a system of 'adverse

domination,' in which private interests mostly outside Imperial Valley benefit at the expense of the Imperial Valley."

The report notes that San Diego attorney David Osias is the lawyer for the irrigation district and is managing partner of the firm Allen Matkins, which specializes in real estate. Osias has given the Imperial irrigation district bad advice that has been a boon for San Diego real estate developers, say Hanks and Scaroni. In turn, the San Diego County Water Authority "is dominated by the real estate industry," says Hurlbert.

"We're just a pimple on [Osias's] butt compared to his clients [in San Diego]," says Hanks. In counting on the state to pick up the tab for Salton Sea rehabilitation, "our lawyers blew it. We can't afford to mitigate."

In effect, the water needs of San Diego developers are dictating Imperial Valley policy, says San Diego attorney Mike Aguirre, a coauthor of the 54950 Commission report. "The [San Diego] developers want to develop but not pay for infrastructure needed to support the development," says Aguirre.

Osias says Scaroni and his friends are orchestrating "a smear campaign" to oust two Imperial Irrigation District directors. Lawsuits by Scaroni and fellow farmers against the district have lost consistently. Osias says it is "nonsense" that he is working on behalf of San Diego developers. "There is no reason to think that the state will not meet its binding contractual obligation [on Salton Sea rehabilitation]."

Dennis Cushman, assistant general manager of the San Diego County Water Authority, does not anticipate that the authority will have to share in the Salton Sea rehabilitation cost. "We work to press the state to fulfill its commitment," he says.

But, says University of California San Diego

political scientist Steve Erie, "There is a time bomb called the Salton Sea. The environmental problems of the Salton Sea make the drying up of Owens Lake look like a walk in the park. It will blow up the [water transfer deal], and the mit-

igation costs will be piled

on San Diego ratepayers." ■

p.m., Kenneth Mose, 24, left his apartment to get a snack, walking the short distance to the shopping center. Usually he went with a roommate, maybe because on previous trips "Hispanic males" had yelled at him and made "derogatory racial comments." But that January night he was walking alone.

"Hey, is that a black person?" Sadboy said, except he didn't say "black person."

"Put on your hoodie and get ready to go to work," Sadboy said to Gonzalo.


Gonzalo and Sadboy jumped out of the truck. They chased Mose down the middle of the street. They knocked him to the ground. Witnesses later said they heard somebody yell, "This is Sadboy from Fallbrook."

Mose was facedown near the Carl's Jr. in the corner of the Albertsons shopping center when sheriff's deputies found him. He was having trouble breathing and could barely talk. A couple of hours later, in the hospital, he died of his stab wounds.

Investigating the crime, deputies studied surveillance video from nearby businesses and noticed a pickup truck circling the area during the time of the assault. A couple of days after the murder, they pulled over a maroon F-150 and arrested Ramos.

Eventually investigators learned that Sadboy and Gonzalo had been joined in the assault by Enrique Martinez, 23, aka Limps,

who had run over from the trailer park, where the men lived. Limps was a Vario Fallbrook Loco, as were Sadboy, aka Salvador Lopez, 19, and Ramos, 19, whose gang name was Caves. Gonzalo, 31 and married with children, did not belong to the

Both Limps and Gonzalo told investigators they didn't expect it to be a stabbing. They thought it was going to be a beating. But Sadboy pulled out a knife. Everybody got charged with murder.

Limps said that he had been involved with gangs since his freshman year of

high school. He said Gonzalo was not in the gang but was "a border brother." Limps admitted to being present when Mose was stabbed but denied being the stabber. When asked what his involvement was, he said, "I was there beating up the black guy." But he didn't say "black guy."

What had impelled Limps to attack a stranger out for a late-night walk? Limps said that he was willing to do what he "needed to do" to prove he was "down for his neighborhood." He felt bad that the guy had died; he'd just been in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Everybody made plea deals to escape the murder charge, admitting voluntary manslaughter. The last defendant was sentenced on April 20, 2012.

Robert Cruz Ramos, who was driving the truck and whose lawyer said had been shot in the head four years earlier by a black guy, got 16 years in prison.

Enrique Martinez, aka Limps, got 16 years.

The stabber, Salvador Lopez Jr., or Sadboy, got 27 years. He admitted to using the knife, which added 1 year to his sentence, and he admitted it was a hate crime, which added another 4 years.

Gonzalo Ordonez, the border brother, got 6 years, 10 years less than the other accomplices because he was not a Vario Fallbrook Loco.

specialists. "UC San Diego holds several special events throughout the year including but not limited to Graduation, Chancellor's Events, News Conferences, Founders' Day, Associated Students Alumni Gala, and individual college campus events," according to the document, issued June 8. Among talents and services UCSD is seeking are those involving "Flooring, Stage, Rigging and Electrical Installation etc."; "Integrated creative design of scenery, lighting and video displays"; and "Creation of event experiences using lighting, sound, video and more." In addition, the university desires "skilled and client-friendly operators" for video and PowerPoint presentations. It also seeks to fill "critical production positions, especially when talent needs to be brought into markets where local talent is lacking." Expressions of interest are due June 22.

Marco Polo, the lobbyist, comes over Lobbyist Marco Polo Cortes,

another big last-minute giver to Councilman Todd Gloria's cause, has kept a busy schedule at San Diego's city hall, according to a recently filed lobbyist disclosure statement. Besides hosting a Gloria fundraiser that garnered \$3500 between February 1 and March 31, according to his filing, his Cortes Communications was paid \$1500 to "monitor a [city] towing contract" for client American Towing, Inc. That involved contacting Rudy Lopez and Melina Meza, staffers with eighth district Democratic councilman David Alvarez, as well as the police department's Patrick Norris and Catherine Blake, along with Linda Peter of the city attorney's office.

Cortes also reported he lobbied Cesar Solis, David Ramirez, Chuck Kaye, and Sandy Albrekson, all of the police department, along with mayoral staffer Victoria Joes. The topic was approval of a conditional use permit and live entertainment permit for the

Beer Company, an establishment near Sixth and Broadway, which describes itself on its website as "a locally owned restaurant and brewery." He was paid \$1000 for that. San Ysdiro's Border Transportation Council hired Cortes to request "law enforcement control of legal transportation providers," according to his filing. For \$1500 from the council, he lobbied Miguel Rosario and Carlos Lacarra of the police department, as well as eighth district councilman Alvarez, along with his staffers Lopez and Meza.

Cortes returned to city hall and lobbied Alvarez and his staff as well as traffic engineering's George Gazallo "for reasonable regulation" of San Ysidro pedicabs, including a "study of pickup/drop-off zones & reduced speed limit to 25 MPH." Eco Pedi-Cabs paid \$1500 for that assignment. Finally, Cortes received \$1000 from the Greyhound bus company to lobby the police department's David Nisleit and Manny Guaderrama "regarding traffic control during events at Petco Park."

The Division of Ratepayer Advocates, part of the California Public Utilities Commission, says that this abrupt dropping of service is much shorter than the current legally required minimum notice. "I think this is going to hurt the most vulnerable households the worst," says Kim Malcolm, who came in recently as executive director of watchdog Utility Consumers' Action Network (UCAN).

The National Consumer Law Center notes that this program, which would be the first of its kind in California, will endanger people's health, as refrigerators suddenly go dark and food spoils, among other dangers to the neediest families.

Malcolm points out that there will be public hearings

Opposition to Quail Brush Power Plant continues

Santee — Residents from Santee and San Diego are ramping up their fight against a plan from Cogentrix Energy to build a 100-megawatt, natural-gas-fired power plant on the edge of Mission Trails Regional Park, where Santee and San Diego meet.

Two weeks ago, conservation group Preserve Wild Santee submitted a letter to San Diego Mayor Jerry Sanders and the City's planning commissioners urging them to reject the Quail Brush Power Plant. Mayoral hopeful Bob Filner signed the letter along with elected officials in Santee and environmental groups.

"SDG&E says they can meet demands for power this summer, that is, even with San Onofre [Nuclear Power Plant] offline. The article validates the point that a new power plant is not needed," wrote one resident in an email.

San Diego's Planning Commissioners will vote on the project at a June 28 hearing.

Man who mailed heroin to jail is sentenced

Carlsbad/Vista — Lee Edward Amesquita, 37, was sentenced to 8 years in prison this morning for three separate counts of mailing heroin into jail. Amesquita sent the hidden drug to his incarcerated girlfriend, according to evidence presented during a

two-week trial last April.

Amesquita ironed out the sticky black tar heroin between parchment paper and then sandwiched that between greeting cards, which he then mailed to 42-year-old Marion Lopez at the Vista jail. After the illicit ingredients were intercepted in June 2011, the girlfriend was discovered dead in her jail cell. An autopsy determined Marion Lopez died of respiratory failure due to heroin withdrawal.

Prosecutor Jon Oliphant noted that drugs are a valuable commodity in the jail, "worth perhaps ten times what they would be worth on the streets."

Hurry Up, Mr. Postman

Postal service audit blasts mail carriers for inefficiency San Diego — "Neither snow, nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed rounds," Herodotus wrote back in 503 B.C., but then he never met the efficiency experts from the U.S. Postal Service's office of Inspector General.

In a June 5 report, the IG's office blasts San Diego's mail carriers for wasting time and money on the job and suggests things they need to do to improve their delivery speed.

The auditors took out their apparently hidden cameras and stopwatches and "determined the San Diego District could use at least 6 minutes less street time per day on each carrier route, or about 83,900 work hours annually.

"As a consequence, the Postal Service would save about \$3.4 million annually."

San Onofre to Remain Offline Through Summer

It's official: both of the troubled nuclear generators at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station will remain offline throughout the summer, according to plant operator Southern California Edison.

Edison expects to present a safety plan to restart the plant's Unit 2 reactor, which was originally taken offline for routine maintenance, by the beginning of July, though gaining approval from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to resume operations will take at least another month. Plans for Unit 3, in a state of emergency shutdown after tubes in the plant's steam generating unit burst, leaking radiation into the atmosphere, will take longer to develop.

On another front, the website *Politico* earlier this week publicized a *list of allegations* brought forward by Rep. Ed Markey (D-MA) charging personnel intimidation and retaliation against whistle-blowers at Commission regional offices.

The accusations that safety concerns within the government monitoring agency are being suppressed mirror those *already* voiced by San Onofre workers. Despite reported fear of employer retaliation, the plant for at least the past two years has led the nation in substantiated safety claims.

Piling on, Judge Richard Posner in Chicago recently issued a statement critical of a "strange and dangerous" lack of oversight concerning security clearances at nuclear power facilities throughout the country.

"The safety of nuclear energy facilities cannot be taken for granted," wrote Posner, criticizing policies that did not involve the Commission in a process that resulted in the firing of two employees at a different plant after one failed a drug and alcohol test and another was found to be lying about his alcohol abuse.

Finally, nuclear power activists with San Onofre Safety and other groups penned a letter this week to Commission chairman Gregory Jaczko bemoaning the recent discovery of flaws in San Onofre's diesel backup generators that could have led to their inadvertent shutdown in the event of an earthquake, which in turn could have caused a nuclear meltdown.

Last year, the Reader **spoke with nuclear expert/muckraking journalist Greg Palast**, who expressed little faith in the ability of the generators to function properly even if the earthquake sensors were operating properly. He pointed to a test of a similar backup system at the dismantled Shoreham Nuclear Power Plant in NewYork, in which all three of the backup generators failed shortly after coming online.



San Francisco Hippie Tour

Ten minutes late, a woman wearing sparkly orange tennis shoes and a long velvet coat walks up to the street corner, shouting to us in a New York accent. "Are you here for the Flower Power walking tour?" We nod and Izu, our guide, waves us over.

Originally from Yonkers, Izu was 14 when her parents took her to San Francisco during the 1967 "Summer of Love." Enamored with the Grateful Dead, she moved to the area at 17 and has lived here ever since. Izu is a Haight &

Ashbury original.

Our first stop on the tour is Golden Gate Park, where the Human Be-In took place in 1967. Two hundred thousand hippies came here to participate in a grand party and Allen Ginsberg read his poetry. Today, a circle of drummers with debris in their hair sit underneath a tree.

We next head over to Cole Street, where Izu points out the Charles Manson apartment. "People always talk about the dark side of the hippies," Izu says. We won't pass by the house directly because the lady who lives there gives people the finger. "She's not happy about the Victorian's history," Izu explains.

We turn onto Belvedere Street instead and see a condemned building with an impressive mural. The Diggers lived here, says Izu. They set up a homeless shelter and lived in a commune, preferring to barter rather than use money.

We walk on to Ashbury Street, where the Grateful Dead lived at number 710, the Hell's Angels fought inside the Victorian across the street, and Janis Joplin lived down the hill at number 635.

Finally, we turn onto Haight Street. Izu points to a mural of Jimi Hendrix. The people who lived inside that apartment building once gave shelter to draft dodgers.

Hip businesses inhabit Haight Street today, including body-piercing shops and used-record stores. The local government doesn't allow chain stores to exist here, only small businesses — which include the Power to the People Coffee Shop and the cooperative Anarchist Bookstore, which has been in business since the '70s.

The last stop on Izu's route is the Psychedelic Museum. Inside a private Victorian, a small living room is filled with memorabilia, including a poster of Ken Kesey's Magic Bus and copies of Adam Cohen's underground magazine *The Oracle*.

San Diego Outdoors with the Canyoneers

KUMEYAAY LAKE

This short, easy hike along a cottonwood and willow-shaded lakeshore is perfect for young children, seniors, and avid birdwatchers

Distance from downtown San Diego: About 15 miles. Drive time, 25 minutes. Take SR-163 north to I-8 and head east. From I-8, take I-15 north and exit on Friars Road, heading east. Turn left (or north) on Mission Gorge and drive 5.4 miles. Take a sharp left on Father Junípero Serra Trail. The entrance to Kumeyaay Lake Campground is 0.2 mile on the right, at Bushy Hill Drive. Parking for day-use is on the right. Open all year, sunrise to sunset — day use only. Facilities. • **Hiking length**: up to 2 miles. Out and back, 1 mile for each side of the lake. Allow at east 1 hour. **Difficulty**: Easy, flat trail with shade and occasional benches.

Lumeyaay Lake Campground is part of the 5,700-acre Mission Trails Regional Park (MTRP), owned and operated by the City of San Diego. Until the early 1970s, the lake

was part of a sand and gravel mining operation. The H.G. Fenton Material Company's Monarch Plant produced concrete, plaster, and gunite sand. After the lake was mined out.


it was turned into a camping and fishing facility called Hollins Lake Fish Farm and Lake Recreational Facility, named for Mary Hollins, who was instrumental in creating a facility where seniors could fish. The rehabilitated-habitat area was planted with riparian vegetation, especially willow. The willows along the streams and lakeshore grew into thickets attracting the federally endangered least Bell's vireo.

The facility was closed in 1985, and the area north of the lake became a least Bell's vireo mitigation site for the California Department of Transportation SR-52 freeway project. Today, the lake can no longer be circumnavigated because the north side of the lake is closed off by locked gates to protect nesting areas of the federally endangered bird. Listen for their call that is an angry, fast-sounding "don't-you-tell-me-what-to-do."

Now renamed Kumeyaay Lake, the lush vegetation has created a first-class botanical and wildlife habitat with both riparian and chaparral plants. In December 2000, MTRP opened the campground with 46 primitive sites for tent camping and recreational vehicles. Unfortunately with budget cuts, the campground is now limited to day-use only.

From the parking area, walk north toward the lakeshore, past restrooms and picnic areas, where short paths lead either left or right. Interpretive signs here depict many of the bird varieties that can be found around the lake area, including the California blue-gray gnatcatcher, the common raven, the wrentit, California quail, the great blue heron, the great egret, mallard, American coot, great horned owl, Anna's hummingbird, western scrub jay, red-winged black bird, black phoebe, California towhee, acorn woodpeckers, and the least Bell's vireo. Also watch for birds of prey, including the osprey, white-tailed kite, American kestrel, red-shouldered hawk, Cooper's hawk, sharp-shinned hawk, and the red-tailed hawk. The sounds of birds and running water are joined in the late afternoon with the sounds of crickets and bullfrogs. Waterfowl glide across the lake surface, making hypnotic kinetic ripples.

The trail to the left (or west) crosses over a cement bridge that allows water from the San Diego River to flow into the lake. Just beyond are a small amphitheater and a replica



of a Kumeyaay 'ewaa, a hut made from the branches of willows. Slightly further is the locked gate, beyond which there is no entry. However, just to the south of the gate is a 0.1 mile shaded trail that leads to a view from the center of the lake. Shade trees around the lake include cottonwoods, sycamores, willows, and mule fat. From this point, retrace your steps back to the interpretive signs, which completes one mile. For a second mile, explore the route to the right (or east) until you reach the second locked gate on the north side of the lake.

Plants that may be in bloom include the yellow Hooker's evening primrose, the pink California wild rose, whitish-pink California buckwheat, a golden prickly pear, the white blooming yerba mansa (or lizard tail), yellow dandelions and mustard, and pink thistles. Also look for curly dock, white-blooming ceanothus and jimsonweed, horehound, and tree tobacco.

Signs around the lake indicate sensitive habitat. Bicycles are allowed only on paved roads and not on the paths around the lake. Fishing is allowed as well as dogs on leashes.

Canyoneers are San Diego Natural History Museum volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks that teach appreciation for the great outdoors. For a schedule of free public hikes: http://www.sdnhm.org/education/naturalists-of-all-ages/canyoneer-hikes/

Singapore. Knowing I would be suffering from fatigue, lack of sleep, and jet lag, not to mention the curse of coach travel — cramped muscles from confined space — I was bummed to have such a large chunk of nonproductive

But, as it turned out, I was wrong. After wandering around the terminal to stretch my legs, I discovered the intracacies of Singapore's Changi International Airport. It won me over to the point that I now dub Changi my favorite layover the best in the world.

Changi International is a major aviation hub in Southeast Asia and noted for its service and amenities; there are over 28,000 people employed at the airport. With numerous information booths located throughout the airport, you get answers from "real" people to any travel-related questions quickly.

Feeling under the weather? Pay a quick visit to several of the terminalbased medical clinics and have prescriptions filled at one of the pharmacies. There's also a transient hotel where you can book a room, shower, and sleep

before your connection — all for a reasonable price.

Hungry? You can chow down on fast food, just like at any airport, or slow your pace with Changi's array of sitdown dining options.

And, of course, there's duty-free shopping for international travelers. By the time I finished my shopping foray, I was out over \$1200 but walking away with the latest in ultra-thin laptops, an AE Aspire Ultrabook.

The biggest surprise was discovering the freebies at Changi: from free computer access, free Wi-Fi, free computer-gaming and free movies to free 24-hour napping areas, a prayer room, and even a baby-care room; it's a regular airport Shangri-La.

And then there are the free city tours. If you have at least five hours before your connection, take advantage of the complimentary two-hour city

My absolute favorite in Changi has to be the Nature Trail, which included six open-air gardens scattered throughout the terminals — orchid, sunflower, cacti, bamboo, fern, even a butterfly



Wagner was a fan because the music has pride of place in Carmen. Most of the characterization of these people isn't in the words they say but in the music they sing. If we allow ourselves to let the music be our guide, the characters take on the complexity that is missing in the libretto.

I like to call this the Pagliacci effect. Canio isn't

a sympathetic character in Leoncavallo's opera; in fact, he's kind of a jerk. However, at the end of the show, we are right there with him bawling our eyes out even though he's killed his wife and her lover.

It's the same with Carmen. Somehow we get it and we relate to these characters. Take the music away and the characters deteriorate into uninteresting blobs of melodrama.

PROM DATE

Whom should I ask to prom? I've never been to prom, and I want to go badly. I want it to be perfect, so I've put it off year after year. How can it be perfect if I ask just any ol' girl? I also have to find the perfect restaurant and the perfect hotel room. That's right, hotel room.

The BBC Proms were started as a concert series in 1895 by Robert Newman and Henry Wood at Queen's Hall in London. The original title of the concert series was Mr. Robert Newman's Promenade Concerts.

The BBC took over the series in 1927, and the BBC Orchestra was formed in 1930. During World War II, Queen's Hall was destroyed in the Blitz, and the Proms moved to Royal Albert Hall in 1941. Royal Albert Hall remains their home.


What exactly are the Proms? They are the greatest musical festival in the world. They run for 70 days during the summer and feature the great musicians of the world

Here's a sample of what a week at the Proms is like. If you attended for the week starting on Monday, July 16, you would get to hear a concert of French songs, Respighi's Roman Festivals, Ravel's Piano Concerto No. 2, Richard Strauss's Also Sprach Zarathustra and Four Last Songs, Sibelius's Symphony No. 7, Rachmaninoff Piano Concerto No. 2, Prokofiev Symphony No. 6, Handel's Water Music, Royal Fireworks, and Judas Maccabeus, Beethoven's Symphonies No. 1, 2, 3, and 4, Bach's Art of the Fugue, and Berlioz's five-hour-long opera, Les Troyens.

By the way, that list is just the highlights of the week and doesn't include all the pieces being performed.

It's a nice list but who are the performers? How about superstar conductors Daniel Barenboim and Sir Antonio Pappano?

With the Olympics falling smack in the middle of the Proms, perhaps this isn't the year for me. Maybe next year. ■



They're wearing red T-shirts with a message: "Keep Calm and Eat Well."

on the grass, plates of savory smoked salmon on flatbread, accompanied by

sour cream, lemon, and potato salad, plus beer-battered fish and chips, spiced ground lamb on salad leaves, raita (the salty, minty Indian yogurt), and naan Indian bread. For dessert, the Queen Mother's favorite: Eton Mess, a strawberry compote with crumbled meringue and fresh mint.

And you've just gotten this from a...food

You betcha. Blanket included. Pretty soon, we might be taking tiffin, the afternoon tea-and-scones tradition dear to the Brits.

Again, from a food truck?

Welcome to the brainchild of Dave and Kevin Keylock, two brothers I've been trying to catch up with for a month. They discovered San Diego after a snowboarding vacation in Colorado a couple of years ago. (They came here afterward, to warm their tootsies, and decided that this was where they wanted to live and work.) Kevin is a business major, while Dave is a chef who cooked for a few months for Queen Elizabeth (yes, the Jubilee gal herself) at Buckingham Palace. Which has to be where they got the idea for the name of their San Diego food truck: "God Save the Cuisine."

Locating them hasn't been easy. By the time I find their red truck inside the gated apartment complex of Archstone in Mission Valley, I feel like Henry Morton Stanley, the American journalist-explorer who found Dr. David Livingstone in the African jungle.

So, okay, in the wilds of the San Diego river valley, I come up to these two lanky guys.

They're wearing red T-shirts with a message: "Keep Calm and Eat Well."

Veddy English.

"Doctors Livingstone, I presume?" I say. Well, actually, what I say is: "Dave? Kevin?"

Their red truck looks like a cross between a London bus and a UPS van. And, right now, the

guys look beat.

"This has been our busiest day, ever," Kevin says. "It's incredible. Everybody seems to have

come out of their apartments. And each one is buying for two or three others. We completely ran out of things like our spiced lamb on naan."

Naan? He shows me the item on the menu, written on chalkboard and set on a sidewalk

stand.

"It's the Indian influence back home," says Dave. "Spiced lamb on an Indian flatbread naan — is popular there. People seem to be liking it here, too."

Fish and chips is their most popular item, and after that, the spiced lamb, Indian-style.

Most things on the board are pretty English, like the banger, broccoli from the griddle, and chips ("fries," it explains), for \$7. Except, hey, there're fish-and-chip tacos (\$8) — two tacos with "local beer-battered fish, with homemade coleslaw and tartar sauce and malt vinegar and salt for the truck-cut chips (fries)."

"We do want to adapt to some local customs," says Dave.

Then they have smoked salmon on flatbread (\$9) and pear salad (\$7). Plus a dessert: organic strawberries (\$4).

I'm looking at the board, trying to decide. "Usually we have a bigger selection," Kevin says.

Turns out, the only two items left after tonight's rush are the smoked salmon and your basic fish and chips — not in tacos. That's fine by me. Which one should I get? What the heck, why not order both. I'm thinking of taking the salmon home to Carla.

Ten minutes later, the freshly battered fish comes out steaming, sitting on top of this little Indian flatbread loaded with coleslaw and arugula and radish slices. Tartar sauce sits on top. Then lots of fries, and three little plastic pots, one filled with vinegar, one with sea salt, one with ketchup. Plus a slice of lemon.

I'm glad to have that interesting naan instead of tacos. With the coleslaw and arugula, it's different and refreshing.

I leave the salmon for the lovely Carla to open later. Well, that's not quite true: I do have a quick look, and, okay, a quick bite. Beautiful pink slices with sour cream on top, naan underneath, with arugula and — and this is great — tangy capers scattered around.

This is when somebody I'd noticed moving about in the truck comes outside. Lani, Dave's American wife. "I really taught them how to cook," she says.

She's kidding, of course. She met Dave while he and Kevin were on that snowboarding trip in Colorado. Before that, Dave had been at culinary school in the UK; he ended up being chosen to apprentice at Buckingham Palace. "My favorite member of the family?" he says. "The Queen Mum. She was the funniest person there. She'd chase off people who wanted to help her walk, when she was getting a little frail. We loved her."

So, is this a comedown? Food truck, way out West, after the palace?

"Absolutely not. I always dreamed of having our own place, but normal start-up costs are way too high. This food-truck phenomenon makes it possible. We find ourselves at the cutting edge. It gives us a learning curve and the chance to experiment."

Like, serving up streetside roast-beef dinners, with Yorkshire pudding and horseradish and watercress. Scones and strawberries and cream. "We're thinking of doing our version of Taco Tuesdays. Ours will be 'Tea Tuesdays,'" Dave says. "Afternoon tea on the roadside."

Now I notice all the plaid rugs, rolled up below the counter for easy grabbing.

"These are for people to spread on the grass by the truck. Make a picnic of it. We English love spontaneous picnics."

In the end, I have the last of their strawberries and cream (\$4), "just the way the Queen Mum loved them," with fresh mint leaves and handwhipped — almost clotted — cream.

I bet Prince Charles, the nature farmer, would love them, too. These are organic, from Suzie's Farm in IB. The guys say they're sourcing everything from right here in 'Diego.

Dave says gastro-trucks aren't really happening in England yet. "Maybe we should do that some time," he says. "Take Californian food to the streets of London."

Oh, yeah. I can just see him and Kevin and Lani driving their food truck straight into his old gig, Buckingham Palace, and calling out in the great Cockney tradition, "Tacos! Vegan burgers! Grunion fritters! Fit for a queen!" ■



Happy Hour, After Hour, After Hour

Unobtrusively perched on Adams Avenue in Normal Heights, Cantina Mayahuel has what just might be the longest happy hour I've ever seen:

Tuesday through Friday from 12-6. Those are some seriously happy hours. Can you even call it happy hour at that point? I don't know.

What I do know is that the cantina serves up \$5 margaritas and \$6 street-taco plates during that extended period on weekday afternoons. The margaritas, which contain organic lime juice, agave nectar, orange liquor, and tequila, are humble affairs. Served in rocks glasses and unadorned, save a salted rim, the drinks come with a choice of reposado or blanco tequila, and they

pack a pretty ferocious punch. I found the simple composition of Cantina Mayahuel's margaritas showcased the flavor of the spirits.

The street tacos can come with sirloin steak, chicken, or carnitas, and the meats cannot be mixed and matched. An order of the steak tacos was perfectly reasonable, effectively costing \$2

per taco, and the food matched the margarita nicely. Much like the cocktail, the little tacos were unpretentious but good. The meat had a deep flavor of char from the grill, although it was a bit on the chewy side and the pieces had been cut large. They had cheese, cabbage, crema, and a splash of hot sauce on top.

A big part of Cantina Mayahuel's charm is in its decor. The somewhat dusky interior has the feel of a rustic saloon with its rough-hewn tables and bar. It's a place to get out of the sunlight. Out

back, a spacious patio is partly covered in a way that lets in just the right amount of afternoon sky. The two spaces are somewhat opposed to each other, which only serves to heighten the cantina's overall character.

When that endless happy hour eventually winds down, as it sadly must, Cantina Mayahuel does offer a broader menu of tacos, tortas, salads,

> and daily specials. There are also plenty of draft beers, wines, and fine tequilas to try.



"Super Local" Mystery

In a post last week about a new "super local" tavern opening in Hillcrest, I openly wondered what

the term "super local" means. The next day, I received word about a new line of beers being released by Mira Mesabased Green Flash Brewing Company that, in my mind, just might qualify as being "super local."

Starting this summer, Green Flash will release its San Diego beer series, an evolving line of brews named after regions throughout the city. The first three beers in

the series include 30th Street Pale Ale, Park West Porter and East Village Pilsner. Naming beers after sections of America's Finest City isn't a new practice. Coronado Brewing Company's been offering its Orange Avenue Wit for years, Stone Brewing Company put out a quaffable collaborative ode to State Route 78 back in 2011, and most of Santee-based Manzanita Brewing Company's beers are named after something having to do with the municipality they call home.

But there's more to Green Flash's San Diego series than monikers. It's actually step one in the company's Brewing It Forward initiative, a charitable program built to benefit grassroots humanitarian organizations. On June 26, Green Flash will hold a kick-off event for Brewing It Forward where the San Diego series beers will debut, and a portion of proceeds from sales of all three will be donated to local charities. The majority of the charities Green Flash funnels funds to will be associated with underrepresented redeveloping communities as well as neighborhoods with high craft beer presence. Many of these places are one and the same, with North Park, Park West, and the East Village — the communities called out by the beers, images of which will appear on the labels of each brew — serving as prime examples.

The San Diego series beers, all of which have actually been around for years but have been renamed (30th Street Pale Ale hasn't changed, but East Village Pilsner was called Fizzy Yellow Beer and Park West Porter was Traditional Porter) will only be distributed in San Diego. Five dollars from each case of the beers sold will be distributed to Green Flash's list of charities, which will



Where Even a Monday Can Turn Into a Party!

During our cul-de-sac viewing of the recent solar eclipse, my neighbor turned hostess by bringing out wine, cheese, and crackers for us to munch on while we contemplated our sacrifice for the return of the sun. Wendy pointed out that our sustenance was from the local wine-and-cheese shop up the street, La Costa Wine Company. A few weeks later, sun shining brightly and my cheese wish list in hand, I entered the dimly lit shop located in the strip mall across from the Dove Library.

I was immediately disappointed because the cheese counter was smaller than I had

expected. But I headed over to the counter after being greeted by a young woman, Samantha. The cheeses they did have looked worthwhile and this was a wine store, after all, so I waited as she greeted someone else. In response to her offer of help, I told her about the cheeses that I was looking for: Boer Piet's Boerenkaas, blueberry Stilton, and geitost, THE Norwegian cheese. They didn't have the first two, but she had several good suggestions about where to find the blueberry Stilton. On the other hand, not only did they carry geitost (spelled in an alternate spelling: gjetost), but she was able to tell me how it was made, varieties, etc. She put out a sample and then went to help the other customer.

I strolled around, noticing that they also sell beer, ale, sake, cigars, wine-related gifts, and various accompaniments for cheese. A menu board was posted in a bar area with wines available for tasting, options for cheese plates, and a sandwich (that was only available Thursdav-Saturday). Samantha came over to check on me and took my order for a three-cheese plate. I told her that I wanted a cheese plate made up based on the gjetost offering with a wine pairing. She was obviously challenged by my request, but I was confident because she seemed to know her cheeses.

In the meantime, a woman and a couple had come in separately. They sat in the bar area as well. Samantha brought out my cheese plate and explained the cheeses and wine she had chosen to accompany the gjetost. The cheese plate came with olives, dried fruit, Mar-

cona almonds, and a basket with thin slices of baguette and crackers. The other customers ordered cheese plates and wine too. As we were enjoying the wine and cheese, conversation began to flow. Samantha chatted with Diane. Lisa, a loan officer, told me that the shop had competitive prices, a great selection, and a knowledgeable owner. She had even had a get-together there. If they ever do a commercial, they should definitely include her! She also pointed out that there used to be another wine store in the same location with a very similar name that had been very over-priced.

With regards to their wine selection, Samantha explained that their best seller was a chardonnay, San Simeon. It was priced at \$13.99. She said that they also have an excellent selection of rosés, usually eight or nine to choose from. Musicians perform on Thursday nights and they have tasting events. They have also taken over the adjacent storefront to store wines for people in temperature-controlled lockers. As she brought out gjetost and chocolate for us all to sample on this Monday evening and the crowd grew larger, I had to agree with Lisa that the La Costa Wine Company was a comfortable place to be.

Hey, Babbo...

Fact: my former neighbors owned the Gulf Coast Grille that was on Park Boulevard at the border of University Heights and Hillcrest. Gulf Coast is no more and the building is now home to Babbo's. My neighbors, as far as I know, live in Julian now and run a bed-and-breakfast.

According to the bartender (and logic) Babbo's Bar and Grill is the present incarnation of Babbo Grande, which used to be down on University Avenue. Since the Gulf Coast vacated, the building has gotten a bit of a makeover and it's more open in front and a little brighter and less moody. The atmosphere (and the food as well) seems very family oriented. When I was in there the majority of parties were multi-generational. A \$5 kids menu hammers that point home.

The menu is the odd, but not unpleasant, combination of crepes, breakfast, and pasta. There are a few sandwiches, too, but the fact that breakfast is served anytime is going to draw attention away from sandwiches for a lot of people. People in the mood for normal dinner will find a selection of pasta dishes that start under \$10 and can climb to around \$13 or \$14 with the addition of meat.

I tried an order of beef stroganoff, which proved to be absolutely enormous. The huge, shallow bowl was filled with egg noodles, beef, and mushroom sauce. A few slices of garlic bread accompanied the dish. It was not a particularly sophisticated dish — indeed none of the food inside looked like it was trying to take any cues from haute cuisine — but that's not a strike against it, by any means. For a family restaurant, I would place it somewhat

above the average in terms of both quality and value.

Interestingly, Babbo's has a pretty well-stocked bar. I spied a bottle of pisco (a South American brandy) behind the bar and I asked the bartender to whip something up for me. He tried his damnedest to make a sour with the spirit. The end result was heavy on the bitters and a little bit overzealously shaken (and thus watered down), but it was a worthy effort and I anticipate that some really good cocktails might come out of this bar in the future.

And Carlos the bartender was the nicest guy. Ever. In fact, the entire staff seemed to be just about the most cheerful group of people I've seen work a restaurant in a dog's age. They were, to put it mildly, completely in the weeds on a weeknight, but they were all chatting with each other as amicably as could be and working together as well as they could. It was actually inspiring, seeing such a good vibe on a restaurant floor. Major kudos to the staff at Babbo's for that. I would have expected rage and bitterness, being smacked around by a sudden influx of big tops, but I only saw smiles and that was pretty awesome.

Hillcrest Cali-Creole and craft beer haven, Local Habit, is about to turn one. It seems like only vesterday I was monitoring its transformation from its former identity as Pizza Fusion

to its current all things local and sustainable model. I guess time flies when you're lapping up lagniappes and lagers.

Because the restaurant is ingredient-driven, the menu has evolved with the passing of each season and microclimate shift, affording regulars a variety of dishes to sink their teeth into. with a somewhat grandmotherly flair. Still, the Mission Beach vibe peeked through with the occasional picture of a surfer girl on the walls.

A large coffee is \$1.85 and espresso drinks start at \$2.25, which actually puts the coffee on the cheaper side of the average. I paid \$1.75 for a cup of hot tea. The breakfast menu ran beyond the coffee shop norm, a quality I've been looking for lately. I could have taken my pick from a bevy of scrambles and breakfast burritos, but the addition of half a dozen kinds of pancakes, some french toast, and plenty of fresh fruit bowls made the choice a little more involved. I appreciate being able to eat something other than the same old breakfast sandwich.

I ended up going for a stack of banana walnut pancakes, which came in on the cheaper side of breakfast, just like the coffee: \$5.75 got me two large pancakes topped with fruit and nuts. I could have stood for a few more walnuts and sliced bananas, and the syrup was artificial rather than real maple, but I had few complaints overall.

I had trouble getting on the internet in the Olive Cafe.

Neither my phone nor my Chromebook could access their network, and that could be problematic for writers and students, but fingers are crossed that it's a short-term problem.

Another weird thing that happened was the following: as soon as I sat down inside, a girl came in, sat down at another table, and promptly pulled out a glossy copy of the Bible. This isn't something you see every day on the beach, as far as I know. Then, when I relocated to the patio to finish my tea in the fresh air, a group of girls was actively engaged in talking about prayer, Jesus, and other Christian subjects next to me.

Now, this is probably just a coincidence, but you never know, maybe it's the Christian hangout. Would Jesus feel good about reasonably priced pancakes? I should certainly hope.

The slow-rise pizza revolution

Today (Tuesday) Napizza Al Taglio flings its doors open (1702 India Street, at the corner of India and Date, 619-696-0802), and we'll all be able to see if happy yeast makes better pizza.

Because the promise of this Roman idea — slow-rise dough — is that you get lighter, more digestible, tastier dough if you give yeast time to have a long

"Most places will let the dough levitate [rise] for 4-5 hours," says Christopher Antinucci. "We allow 72 hours. That gives the living yeast more time to transform complex sugars into simple sugars. That gives it more flavor. And we have more water mixed into the flour. They transform that into air bubbles. That makes lighter crust. You get less bloating. It's healthier. It's the old, slow way, and Rome has brought it back."

They're also big on organic, and on buying locally and seasonally. They promise "absolutely no chemicals or preservatives in our pizzas."

I get talking with Chris beside the multi-oven they've imported from Rome.

"So, say if we're baking a potato pizza, the potato topping needs more cooking than the crust. So we increase the heat from the top but not the bottom. That way, we don't burn

Christopher is one of three partners (along with Giulia Colmignoli and Matteo Castagna, the chef) who all came out from Italy to spread the gospel on this new-old way of making pizza.

He says a slice will cost around \$5.75. But it's a pretty big square, he says. "In Rome al taglio — meaning 'by the slice' — is always square, not a segment of a round pie."

Things are still in a rush of preparation while I'm there. This Czech gal, Edita Semiginovska, is still painting signs.

"It's going to be a blast," says Christopher. "We hope it'll be the first of many."

Musical Chef Shuffle

There's a reason the Reader has a blog subcategory called Musical Chefs. The local restaurant industry is huge and constantly in flux.

Finding the right chef for one's venue can be difficult. Maybe they have the chops, but the wrong personality or style to suit an eatery's concept. Perhaps they have great ideas, but lack the ability or experience to realize them. Maybe their food is excellent, but they lack leadership skills or the ability to manage a kitchen from a logistical or financial aspect. Or, maybe they look great on paper, interview well, but possess any of the countless negative traits or habits that are deal-breakers in any profession, kitchen or otherwise.

Bottom line, sometimes things don't work out and a business owner has to change course. This isn't a phenomenon that applies exclusively to chefs. It can be true for any member of a restaurant team, including those in the front of the house and the individuals who manage them. The importance of a quality general manager cannot be understated in the restaurant game.

Last August, I reported chef Augie Saucedo was making a move from chef de cuisine at the Shores Restaurant to become the executive chef at Sycuan Resort. Not long after, in December, I announced the arrival of another chef de cuisine — Kemar Durfield, of the Grand Del Mar's Addison, had been appointed as the exec at the brand-new Donovan's Fine

Today, both toques' names resurface in the Musical Chefs news stream. Saucedo is now the executive chef at Donovan's Prime Seafood. As I mentioned in February, he was putting out good food at Sycuan, but in relative obscurity. Most people who headed out to the expanses of El Cajon were bypassing his dining room at the resort to go pull slot handles (well, pressing buttons is more accurate nowadays...gotta say I miss yanking on that bandit's singular arm) at the casino. This will certainly be a more high-profile gig for Saucedo, who is taking over for the recently departed Durfield.

Donovan's Prime Seafood also added another veteran to their team, having recently hired long-time San Diego dining industry fixture Mike Mitchell (formerly of Oceanaire, Burlap, and Gingham) as their GM. It's clear experience was important to restaurant ownership and Mitchell brings plenty. In addition to seasoning received at high-volume eateries, his resume also sports previous experience as a past president of the San Diego Chapter of the California Restaurant Association.

No one chef or manager can guarantee the future success of a business, but the addition of Saucedo and Mitchell certainly provide Donovan's a prime opportunity.

sandwich shop (that turned out to be closed), I passed by Yum Yum Yo at the corner of El Cajon Boulevard and Highland Avenue. I've been by the place a time or two before and I always assumed it was a frozen yogurt shop due to the "yo" in the name. I think it *used* to be a yogurt shop, but now YYY is more or less a smoothie and banh mi kitchen. It's also garishly adorable on the inside. Everything is kid-sized and made of plastic in super-saturated colors.

There was a lot of candy for sale, a surprising amount; everything from ten-cent taffies to that spicy, Mexican tamarind stuff. Apparently, the place had been designed with a ten-yearold's perspective in mind.

Still, there was plenty of stuff for adults. Yum Yum Yo has 42 kinds of smoothies and a selection of Vietnamese dishes and banh mi that start at \$3.50. Unfortunately, I didn't see that they had a durian smoothie (!) until after I had ordered an avocado one. The avocado was very good, not too sweet. and whatever Yum Yum Yo is using to blend smoothies must have a one-point-twenty-one gigawatt engine because the fruit and ice had been pulverized to a remarkably fine mist. The resulting texture was very satisfying.

I also tried one of the banh mi sandwiches. It came with different kinds of cold cuts, mayonnaise, crisp vegetables, and plenty of green herbs. It was pretty small, maybe a touch smaller than average, but banh mi are almost never enormous. I wouldn't say it was exceptional, but the bread was good and crispy and the veggies tasted fresh and crunchy; so the texture, which is a big part of this kind of sandwich, was on point.

Yum Yum Yo is at 4444 El Cajon Bouevard. I couldn't get accurate information on when the place is actually open, due to lack of literature and a woefully outdated website, but as far as I can tell, it is open seven days a week during mostly normal business hours.

Massive Burgers and Milkshakes

So, if the Ed Bedford report on Marie's Cafe from a year ago is any indication, this North Park eatery is straight-up haunted by the ghost of the former owner. Cool. Marie's might be easy to miss if not for the big banner that hangs from the building's awning and proclaims that the restaurant was voted as having the "Best Lunch" by the *North Park News* in two separate years. I love these kinds of signs because they practically *beg* for verification.

Inside, I found Marie's to be way bigger than the docile storefront would indicate. Two rooms, separated by a partition, stretched all the way to the back of the building. There were lots of booths and plenty of seats at the lunch counter as well. I would imagine a big crowd of late-night North Park revellers could pack easily inside.

I was sold on a hamburger by the sandwich board out front, and I ordered the half-pound "North Park" burger with cheese on an egg-and-onion

roll. It came with a bunch of fries, lettuce, tomatoes, pickles, and onions for just shy of \$8. Because of the retro feel in Marie's, a milkshake seemed like the proper beverage, even though it cost almost five bucks.

All the servers were super nice and easy to talk to. They weren't icy professionals or anything, just really relaxed ladies with awesome attitudes. It was cool to take a break from the typical North Park scene girls who would have served my food at just about any other sit-down place in the surrounding blocks; sort of like stepping into the 40+ world for a minute, which I enjoy doing on occasion.

When my food came, I was flabbergasted by the sheer size of everything. The burger seemed like a meat-frisbee, but it had been perfectly cooked and carried a lot of rich, smoky flavor from the diminutive grill that I could see the lone cook working at the front of the room. The milkshake didn't come close to fitting into its glass and the excess had to be served in the metal cup

in which the drink had been blended.

It was, frankly, a somewhat ridiculous amount of food and I dove headfirst into it like a little glutton. Yes, I ate the entire burger and finished the milkshake. I left a few fries. I think, at certain times like when I am out doing some drinking (Marie's is open late-night on the weekends) or when I am wildly famished, this burger might be just the ticket. The rest of the menu looked like it would satisfy equally: fried fish and chicken, sandwiches, meatloaf, spaghetti, and the usual run of American comfort food.

"Best Lunch" is really subjective, but Marie's might be a candidate for something more specific, like "Best Diner Food" or something. Anyways, I'll keep it on my mind for certain occasions as described above.

Tricky. Worth It.

I hadn't tried this downtown gastropub yet for a series of reasons; some good, others not. I won't list them because they're rendered irrelevant now that I've eaten at **Proper** (795 J Street). Mary Beth went there for brunch a little while back, but I paid a visit during the more conventional dinner hours

I didn't really know that it was basically *inside* the complex of the ballpark, so finding it and parking proved to be a little tricky. Considering that, the area is actually a lot better than I would expect. The park has been developed in a very pedestrian-friendly way, with big sidewalks and green space for walking dogs or letting kids run around.

Proper occupies a segment of the big building that runs along the edge of park. It has been dressed up to look like an old-time English public house. It's an effect that runs skin deep, however, as the pop hits soundtrack, menu of sweet, brightly colored cocktails, and the high heels and mini-skirts attire of guests and staff alike end up creating a recognizably Gaslamp type environment.

Rather than retiring to unremarkable statues, Proper does manage to distinguish itself in certain notable ways. The beer list has plenty of good brews. The rotating set of drafts is mostly local stuff and the bottle list has some European

favorites, like Houblon Chouffe (that Belgian triple with the gnome on it), among others. The aforementioned specialty cocktails, which looked to be a bit overdone, nevertheless contained brand-name liquor at reasonable prices.

The menu was where Proper really managed to outdo itself. An order of curry chips (\$5.50) was an enormous bowl of fries, thickly cut Kennebec potatoes, and a dish of curry for dunking them. The chips were *almost* too salty, but not quite and therefore extremely satisfying, and there was plenty of curry.

Equally enormous, an order of pork rinds (\$4) filled a basket with crispy *chicharrones* that had been covered in tangy cheese dip and reminded me of a snack I got in a TJ bar one time. Not very British, but very good. I ate nearly the entire basket, restraining myself only out of sheer willpower.

The menu has lots of sandwiches and a few entrées, as well. I tried a shepherd's pie (\$15) that came in a small, cast-iron frying pan. Braised short-ribs had been mixed with vegetables and bound with a thickened stock that tasted of red wine or beer. The filling was good and, well, filling. The mashed potatoes had been piped on top of the pie like cupcake frosting, but they had been worked to a gluey consistency in order to achieve the texture where they could be reliably squeezed out of a piping bag.

A portobello mushroom sandwich (\$12), the only vegetarian, came with a nicely dressed salad and a good bun from Sadie Rose bakery.

I liked the look of the kasekrainer sausage (\$11) or the foot-long chili dog (\$10), both of which boasted house-made links and appropriate presentations. I found that the food was much better than I had expected. Despite the less-than-perfect mash, the shepherd's pie was really quite flavorful and the staff seemed genuinely concerned with whether I was enjoying my meal. I would say that, despite the potentially crowded location and dubious parking situation, Proper merits a visit for the sake of the food, not just because it happens to be right next to the ballpark.

Rock School Reality. It

is the one-year anniversary of Rock and Roll San Diego School of Music and Recording Arts. Housed behind Soma on Sports Arena Boulevard, the campus tour begins in a recording studio. It is tiny but well-equipped. With the soundproof door open, one can hear drumming coming from the practice room next door. The source is a boy named Joaquin. How old? "Seven." Joaquin tells me that he plays drums and guitar, "but not at the same time."

Joaquin's in a band called Shadow Bones with his ten-yearold brother Elijah, who sports purplish hair. Elijah asks if I knew that Justin Bieber taught himself to play drums. I did not. "He started just by tapping."

"The age range of the students here," explains Alex Imming, my tour guide, "is 8 to 12."

A jittery teen girl in a spangled cobalt tube top and stage, Langford runs down his own list of sound-engineering credits, which include Mother Teresa

jeans shoots past us down the hall toward a posse of similarly dressed teen girls.

Rock and Roll San Diego offers private lessons, 6-week and 12-week group classes, and summer camps. It is a one-stop shop for child rockers. The 8000-square-foot facility includes a photo studio, a record label, a music publishing company, and a booking agency. The place also contains a maze of practice rooms, a kitchen, showers, musicians' lounge, and a weight room.


> tracks stand a fresh chance for licensing and royalties by releasing them this way."







Session vocalist Brooke Mackintosh moved from Salt Lake City to San Diego in 2005, meeting Seaholm at a 2009 gig and recording her *Blue Skies Await* full-length with him. After debuting as Seaholm Mackintosh at Swedenborg Hall in March 2010, they decided to put their act on tape, releasing their debut full-length, *Monarchs*, earlier this month. Containing autobiographical songs written together and separately, the album also includes a cover of Ian Moore's "What I've Done."

Last September, the duo welcomed Miles Harper Seaholm to their family. However, despite increasing demands on their time, Seaholm says they don't plan on slowing down their respective careers. "We're both working on solo records, but we prefer performing together."

His wife agrees. "I see Seaholm Mackintosh

Mackintosh: "I listen to iTunes on my smartphone, and Miles and I tend to listen to Baby's Playlist, which has a variety of simply beautiful, melodic, and peaceful tunes in nearly every genre."

MOST EMBARRASSING CD?

Seaholm: "My late pal Buddy Blue used to give me shit about my Hall and Oates LPs. So I bought

myself their CD box set on his birthday this year." Mackintosh: "Probably the Jeremy Jordan CD I bought for a buck when I was in high school."

FAVORITE CONCERT?

Seaholm: "Sting, his first solo American concert at SDSU's Open Air Theatre in 1985. He had everything to prove, and it was like watching the best fireworks show you've ever seen for two and a half hours straight."

Mackintosh: "Tool at Cox Arena when they came into town a few years back. Not only was the band spot-on and the music memorable, but the light show and energy was amazing."

WHAT WOULD YOU TELL THE YOUNGER YOU?

Seaholm: "Stop worrying about your hair." Mackintosh: "True love will never ask you to give up on your dreams."

ANY FEARS OR PHOBIAS?

Mackintosh: "I have a fear of admitting my fears. No, seriously."

Seaholm: "I dove into a sandbar while docking a catamaran in Mission Bay and dislocated my left shoulder."

Mackintosh: "I was rollerblading backwards, didn't see a sewer cover, and I flew about ten feet."

Mackintosh: "That I never made it to my audition for a scholarship at the Berklee School of Music in L.A."

Seaholm: "I stop everything to watch *Jeopardy*." Mackintosh: "My eyes were blue until my early teens"



Maybe you liked the lo-fi early singles by female-fronted acts such as the Dum Dum Girls, Best Coast, and Frankie Rose, But after all three cleaned up their acts for their debut long-players — and cleaned them up further for their follow-ups - maybe you wondered what happened to all that murky reverb, that air of mystery, that hint of danger.

Well, apparently they went to Wax Idols, an Oakland band led by Heather Fedewa, aka Hether Fortune, formerly of Hunx and His Punx. A fan of Nick Cave, Fortune has a dark outlook. This comes across in her lyrics and her intimidating onstage demeanor. (Reportedly, she works as a dominatrix for her day job...if "day job" is the right term for that.) However, it hasn't always come across in the music.

Wax Idols' debut fulllength, No Future, released last year on HoZac Records, sounded like it was recorded in the dank basement of a meth lab, but the songs were upbeat. Sure, they had titles like "Dead Like You," but they were uptempo and catchy. It wasn't hard to imagine Fortune smoothing off her rough edges

and putting out something as family-friendly as Best Coast's The Only Place or, failing that, as professional-sounding as the Dum Dum Girls' Only in Dreams.

Instead, new single "Schadenfreude" sounds like a lost track by proto-Goth band Christian Death, circa 1983, The B-side, "The Last Drop," sounds like Pornography-era Cure, singing inscrutable lyrics about "marriage in a slaughterhouse"



and "dead lovers." It looks as if Fortune isn't going to clean up her act anytime soon, and certainly not in time for her follow-up later this year. Hooray for that.



Bass Drum of Death is a Mississippi garage rock band, a duo. In fact, in the beginning it was just John Barrett, who, not unlike Tim Lowman (a local guitarist who performs as Low Volts), played guitar and sang and kicked hell out of a bass drum. Colin Sneed joined Barrett in 2008, on an instrument he'd never really played much before: the drums. To this day, Sneed plays with a combination of percussive fever and timing issues. His sticks land just slightly ahead of the beat, adding to the dyslexic feel of Bass Drum of Death. Their debut CD, GB, was released last year on Fat Possum, a label that Barrett had worked for at one time. GB is a ream of sleazy lyrics set to a sonic wash

of the '60s on overdrive. The Seeds, Them, the Standells, and the Electric Prunes worked out all of the best guitar patterns long before Barrett was even born. And, like the lost scenes from Blue Velvet that have recently been unearthed, Barrett's music adds little to the body of '60s attitude. But, no matter. Listeners have responded in kind to BDD's loudness. One poetic reviewer called "every cut a bowel-bouncer."

John Barrett remains the band's architect; Sneed punctuates his sentences. Fans and critics alike often ascribe deeper meaning to this band possibly because they aren't used to the sounds of the social disenfranchisement that stained the 1960s. But there really is no deeper meaning to Bass Drum of Death. In Barrett's press release, he writes, "The songs are about drugs, trying to make it with religious girls, panic attacks, stealing stuff, mild to severe depression, Elvis appearing in your dreams and giving you ad-

vice, gravity bongs, and the devil living inside your brain." Even that may be a stretch. I hear two Southern stoners who figured out how to make noise and good times.



San Diego via Tübingen, Germany, pop songwriter Maren Parusel layers reverb-drenched guitar hooks with an assortment of vintage synths on her sophomore album. Tightrope Walker.

The themes presented on the LP were inspired by Nietzsche's landmark book Thus Spoke Zarathustra and the documentary Man on Wire about a French highwire walker who traversed a line between the World Trade Center



Critical Assessment: Scott Marks on the Departing David Elliot

Dave and I can (and have) argue taste and opinion until they unearth the missing reels from *Greed*. What he sees in red-baiting Orson Welles or clothes hanger Audrey Hepburn I'll never know.

There isn't a finer writer of film criticism currently plying their trade. The loss of Dave's critical voice hit me harder than being stung by a hammer. The McClurg Court was a ritzier version of the old Cinema 21, complete with dynamic stereo separation, a wrap-around screen, and perfect sightlines. We had the palace to ourselves, though by way of punishment for paying hooky, the entire film was projected out of frame. Mike Shadow and C. Ling deserved equal billing alongside Matthau and Burns.

As fate would have it, the film let out around the same time Dave's class broke up, and we were spotted exiting the theatre. The next week Dave delivered his version of a stern dressing down. Ray has always been a missing rivet in our cinematic bond. I have since revisited *The Sunshine Boys*, but have yet to step in *Apu*.

Fortunately for me, Dave's reviews (and hourly updates on his daily ablutions) are never more than a phone call away. Dave is the kid on the block your parents would encourage you to befriend, the only soul alive capable of telling me I'm full of crap and making it sound like a compliment. When it comes to picking lifelong friends, I have exceptional taste.

At the risk of going soft on you, the only time you're likely to catch me using the word "Saint" is in reference to Eva Marie or Roger Moore. You, David Elliott, are a Saint.

I vote we replace the recently dismantled kissing eyesore opposite the Midway with a statue of Dave. Hey, why not position it closer to the waterfront tribute to Bob Hope? Wouldn't



Newcomer Sean Anders' "direction" leaves one pining for the Dennis Dugan touch. Is there anything even remotely amusing about *That's My* Bov? LEAD STORY

- In March, authorities in Davis, Okla., after viewing surveillance video, charged Jimmy "Hawkeye" Jeter, 77, with a "detestable and abominable crime against nature" for "violating" a show pig at a barn on the property of the local school system. According to a KFOR-TV report, Jeter told investigators (in farm language, apparently) that he "poured corn out to hold the gilt still" and then "stuck my finger up her private." Nonetheless, he assured them that he was "not trying to poison the gilt" and that he had done this "in the early '70s." Later, he acknowledged that he was acting for sexual gratification.

Ironies

- Earl Persell, 56, was arrested in Palm Bay, Fla., in February when police were summoned to his home on a domestic violence call. Persell's girlfriend said he had assaulted her and held her down by the neck, and then moments later, with his truck, rammed the car she was driving away in. The subject of the couple's argument was legendary singer Tina Turner and her late, wife-beating husband, Ike.

- Mark "Chopper" Read only wanted to help out his son's youth athletics program in the Melbourne, Australia, suburb of Collingwood in February, but was rebuffed. He had offered his assistance at track meets by, for instance, firing the starter's pistol for races, but officials declined after learning that Read had recently been released from prison after 23 years and had boasted of killing 19 people and once attempting to kidnap a judge at gunpoint.

- Damien Bittar of Eugene, Ore., turned 21 at midnight on March 15 and apparently wanted to get a quick start on his legal-drinking career. By 1:30 a.m., his car had been impounded, and he had been charged with DUI, reckless driving, and criminal mischief after he accidentally crashed into an alcohol rehabilitation center.

Fine Points of the Law

— The Internal Revenue Service is battling the estate of art dealer Ileana Sonnabend over the value of a Robert Rauschenberg stuffed bald eagle that is part of his work Canyon. The IRS has levied taxes as if the work were worth \$65 million, but the Sonnabend estate, citing multiple auction-house appraisals, says the correct value is "zero," since it is impossible to sell the piece because two federal laws prohibit the trafficking of bald eagles, whether dead or alive. (Despite the law, the IRS says, there is a black market for the work, for example, by a "recluse billionaire in China [who] might want to buy it and hide it.")

Least Competent Criminals

- Maureen Reed, 41, was charged with DWI in March in Lockport, N.Y., after arriving at a police station inebriated. She had gotten into an altercation with two others at the Niagara Hotel and left to go press charges. The police station is about 200 feet from the hotel, but Reed decided to drive her car there instead of walking.

- Two men were robbed in a motel room in Bradenton, Fla., in February by Cedrick Mitchell, 39, who pulled a handgun on them, but lost it in a struggle when the men started to fight back. One of the men pepper-sprayed Mitchell, sending him fleeing. He returned a few minutes later and begged to buy the gun back for \$40, but all he got was another pepper-spraying. Police arrested

- Asian News International, citing a March China Today report, disclosed that a 68-year-old woman from the countryside, visiting her son in the city of Dalian, China, for the first time, used an unheard-of (for China) 98 tons of water over a two-month period because she was apparently mesmerized by the wonder of seeing her first flush toilet (which she continually engaged approximately every five minutes). (Her use breaks

down to 391 gallons a day, somewhat higher than the average U.S. household.)

- In Port Harcourt, Nigeria, in March, police straightened out the street confrontation between several men and a wheelchair-using man who, they thought, was making their penises disappear. According to National Network Newspapers, the police brought all parties to the station and ordered pants to be pulled down. All organs were said to be intact, but one man still complained that his had been made "lifeless"

- Mishelle Salzgeber, 20, was arrested in March in New Port Richey, Fla., after failing a drug test, which was a condition of her probation for an undisclosed crime. Apparently, Salzgeber knew that she would probably fail on her own and had gone to the trouble of inserting a small tube of someone else's urine into her vagina. Unfortunately for her, a pre-test body-scan revealed the tube. (Besides, authorities tested the urine in the tube and found that it also failed.)


