

#### Filner camp accuses DeMaio on Facebook

Secret meetings with U-T brass Mission Valley — The blowback from councilmember Carl DeMaio's recent admission that he met with U-T San Diego's publisher and CEO, despite saying otherwise at a recent mayoral debate, has now ended up

The page was created by Bob Filner's chief campaign consultant Tom Shepard and is entitled "G-U-I-L-T-Y." As of Saturday, Shepard's post had 38 followers.

At the heading is a link to a report from 10News in which DeMaio denies meeting publicly with the U-T's Doug Manchester and John Lynch. DeMaio also rejected accusations that the purpose of the meetings was to discuss a controversial proposal from Manchester and Lynch to build a new Chargers stadium along the waterfront.

Instead, DeMaio said the meetings were private and did not need to be disclosed publicly.

In the comment section on Facebook, U-T Watchdog editor Ricky Young defended his paper and the councilmember for having private meetings with U-T brass.

"Yeah, I don't really get what makes this an 'admission,'" wrote Young, sparking the debate.

#### **County gas prices soar past** 94-year record

Higher than L.A. and Orange County San Diego — County gas prices are now \$4.69 a gallon for regular, higher than Los Angeles' \$4.66 and Orange County's \$4.65, according to Charles Langley of Utility Consumers' Action Network (UCAN).

The current price is now the highest in California history. The \$4.69 breaks a record, adjusted for inflation, dating back to World War One.

The cause appears to be refinery disrup- $\overset{\mathrm{ti}}{\simeq}$  tions and rationing by suppliers. On Monday, a power failure at Exxon Mobil's Torrance refinery shut down some production.

#### No touching

Friendship Park open again at border fence

San Ysidro/Tijuana — The historic Friendship Park has reopened after a threeyear hiatus, although in a limited program enforced by the United States Border Patrol. The park, which is in the farthest southwest point of the U.S. at Border Field State Park, allows for families split by the border to meet and talk.

The Border Angels Coalition helped push to get the park reopened, which conducted its first day on Saturday, October 6. The park had been closed since 2009 to start construction on a higher grade of fence.

It costs \$5 per vehicle to enter the park when roads are open due to fair weather. A limit of ten people will be allowed at a time near the U.S. side, to allow complete supervision by U.S. agents. The park will only be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday when weather permits. No physical interaction is allowed by the fortified fence.

Able to penetrate police armor

Oceanside — Police finished a special operation in which they arrested 11 persons associated with drug and gang activity, they announced in a press conference this week.





The special investigation began four months ago, police said, when they put a wire-tap on the telephone of George Orosco. who was called a "primary suspect."

Police captain Ray Bechler said Orosco is a documented member of the Posole street gang and is known by the alias "Armstrong" and the moniker "Stretch." Police especially targeted Orosco because of his prodigious sales of methamphetamine, Capt. Bechler told a gathering of news

Police also targeted Wayne Swanson, described as "42-ish," and arrested him on suspicion of drugs for sale and for being a felon in possession of weapons. A large photo was displayed of nine weapons allegedly taken from Swanson's home at the time of his arrest. One handgun, a Desert Eagle .50 caliber semi-automatic,

### **UCAN: Misspelled Accounts Add Up**

Beebe, onetime head of the fraud squad at Utility Consumers' Action Network (UCAN), the once-revered watchdog organization now under a United States attorney criminal investigation, facing a state-mandated audit, and almost penniless. Just a few years ago, UCAN was on TV twice a week, had 17 part-time and full-time

books to accounts with a misspelled word? Call it the "Comsumers" conundrum, although some fraud experts hardly think it's a riddle, since misspelled financial accounts are age-old devices for hiding money.

UCAN's original mission was to battle San Diego Gas & Electric's sky-high profits, but the organization diversi-

"Was there a tit for tat?" with anybody at UCAN, asks one skeptic who is near the top of the watchdog's hierarchy. That's just one question surfacing now. The person posing that query is not one of the two whistle-blowers, Charles Langley and David Peffer, who filed a suit this year against Shames and the organization's board members, stating that Shames did not do required audits; collected unauthorized bonus income; moved money off the books into misspelled accounts; represented himself as an attorney while he was an inactive bar member; directed the movement of \$1 million of corporate money through UCAN to former San Diegan Peter Navarro for the making of an anti-China movie; and lost \$100,000 of the watchdog's money speculating in a hedge fund that Navarro was deeply involved in.

Despite many warnings, the UCAN board failed to do anything about these activities, declared the suit. Indeed, the board's response is redolent of an orchestrated cover-up. Following complex legal skirmishes, some

The watchdog's collapse was all about greed, hubris, and a board that refused to take off blinders, even after whistle-blowers presented extremely strong evidence of financial shenanigans. Many questions remain, but one in particular has not been resolved credibly: why did hundreds of thousands of dollars move off the UCAN

fied into telecom, gas prices, consumer fraud, and privacy rights, among many things. It filed class action suits against various companies for consumer fraud and won big settlements. Frequently, its law firm was the former Milberg Weiss Bershad Hynes & Lerach, the bane of Corporate America, whose San Diego head, William Lerach, went to prison for concealing illegal payments to plaintiffs.

#### **A Real Downer**

he voice on the phone warned the woman to watch herself and not to go to sleep at night. The man asked if she had

"any last words" and said, "Nobody can help you."

The frightened woman listened to the call with officers at police headquarters in Escondido. She had brought her six-year-old daughter with her, arriving in the dark, about 8:15 p.m. Afraid to stand outside with officers, she'd insisted on going inside the building to talk. The woman said her ex-boyfriend was angry because she wouldn't take his calls. He'd told her that he had a gun.


Sergio Alejandro Lopez, 25, had been abusive in the past, and the woman had gotten a restraining order. But, the woman told police, Lopez had said that if he couldn't have her, no one would.

Officers could see text messages from Lopez arriving on the woman's cell phone. He was also calling her, and she took his calls so officers could listen to what he said.

Officers heard the voice describe what the woman's mother was currently wearing, what her nightgown looked like. The woman lived with her mother in a mobile home park. The voice described rooms in the home, although the woman told police that her ex had never been in those rooms. And the man said to "just wait to see" what he would

Around midnight, officers Sean Davidson and Jared Lunt, along with a police canine named Bronco, were sent to the mobile home park on Oak Hill Drive in Escondido. The man's phone calls were trans-





mitted to them, and the two officers heard the man say that he would "do anything," including shoot at officers. And he warned the woman that he was "not going to go out alone" but intended to take a cop with him.

Back at the station, police heard the voice go to a whisper and then "commotion" and sounds of running. Then the phone disconnected.

Searching the mobile home park, Bronco indicated that someone was hiding on the other side of a concrete wall near the clubhouse. Then officers saw a man's head and shoulders appear over the wall as the man hoisted himself up. Lunt yelled out a surrender order with bite warning. The suspect dropped back down and apparently took off running. Lunt boosted Bronco over the wall and sent him off with bite orders, and then the two cops scrambled over.

The fleeing man got atop a tall retaining wall, jumped onto the clubhouse, and ran across the roof. Davidson saw the man draw a gun from his waistband.

Bronco jumped onto the roof and was enthusiastically closing the distance on the fleeing man when Lunt suddenly worried that his dog would be injured jumping off the roof after the fugitive. Lunt stopped his dog with a "down-stay" command.

The suspect leapt back onto the retaining wall, then crouched and turned. Officers say he fired two shots. Lunt said he saw "two muzzle flashes" and believed the man was shooting at him. Then the suspect jumped off the wall and "hit the ground pretty hard and lost several items," according to Lunt.

Investigators collected a cell phone, one shoe, and a spent 9mm shell casing.

quarters for ten hours.

Three months later, Lopez was taken into custody in Mexico. Mexican authorities handed him over to U.S. Marshals. Lopez is said to be a U.S. citizen.

Escondido police say that Lopez is a gang member and that his moniker is "Downer." On his neck, he sports a "WSG" tattoo, for "West Side Gang," according to police records.

Lopez's criminal record began in 2005, the year he turned 18, when he admitted to meth possession and resisting an officer. He was released on unsupervised probation.

A week later, in Escondido, Lopez beat and stabbed a man. The victim was reportedly being punished for calling police about his stolen car. Lopez admitted to using a knife in the assault. Although the plea deal, signed in October 2005, included a four-year prison term, Lopez was out on probation in 2006.

In April 2006, Lopez was accused of assaulting two people with a baseball bat. In the plea deal, he admitted to using the bat on one person and got another fouryear prison sentence.

The February 8 incident at the mobile home park was a third-strike case: Lopez could be sentenced to life in prison. He faced seven felony counts, including assault on a peace officer with a firearm and criminal threats.

But on October 4, a jury declared him guilty of negligent discharge of firearm, felon in possession of firearm, and misdemeanor resisting arrest. Defense attorney Andrew Limberg, who spoke with two jurors after the verdict, said the jury was not convinced that Lopez aimed and fired, believing it more likely that he fired \square unintentionally.

His sentencing hearing is scheduled for December 5.







### Attempted bribe of \$160 for expired plates

Officer Julio Núñez Ulloa allegedly arranged to accept payment from a motorist in exchange for not citing the driver and owner of the automobile for having expired license plates.

The victim allegedly was asked for 2000 pesos (around \$160) in order to not cite him for the past-due *placas*, but that amount was negotiated down to half of that, some 1000 pesos. The payment was to take place in a different location, and as both the officer and the victim had Nextel cellular service, they exchanged numbers.

### Say hi to new turnstiles at border

### Well-lighted room once part of Caliente betting parlor

The new way to walk into Mexico via the San Ysidro route turns out to be pretty simple if one just follows instructions.

No less than six bilingual women wearing red, short-sleeved polo shirts are happy to direct you along the way, once you step off the Blue Line trolley at its last stop in San Ysidro.

Part historical tour and part Stalag 17, the route wends southerly, behind the 1930s U.S.

Customs House, through a canyon of 20-foothigh, three-inch-thick steel bars topped with coils of razor wire. Then one passes through a pair of stainless steel turnstiles graced by a portal bearing the name "MEXICO," all in gray steel and concrete.

Below the bas relief lettering, two new stainless steel turnstiles; one must lean their full weight into them to overcome their inertia. Once through the turnstiles, an interwoven stairway and ramp — abutted to the Mexican side of the rusty metal border fence — plummets downward some eight feet in a vertiginous emulation of an Escher drawing. Then you are in Mexico proper, in a small, tight but well-lighted room that was once part of the "last chance" Caliente betting parlor, a few feet away from the U.S. border.

### Nudie bar opens across street from bayfront

Councilmember Steve Castaneda "shocked"

The Bayfront development got a sudden

jumpstart October 8 when a new place called EyeCandy opened on Bay Boulevard. The establishment features nude dancers and soft drinks.

EyeCandy, visible from the freeway, is located on Chula Vista's E Street exit. It was formerly Anthony's Fish Grotto but was sold, according to the *San Diego Daily Transcript*, for \$2.1 million in December 2011. The buyer was 215 Blvd, LLC c/o Waldon R. Welty.

Mr. Welty made himself available for an interview on the Bay Boulevard premises October 8. "I like the fact that it's across the street from a portion of the bayfront that will remain undeveloped, a natural preserve," said Welty. He also indicated that there is a motel just to the south on Bay Boulevard and card rooms will be opening just a little further south.

In response to a question about a potential attempt to close down EyeCandy, Welty said,

### Like Rubber

very so often I find myself confronted by a seemingly innocuous phrase that rubs me the wrong way. This week, the offending line is "Don't let it get to you," a sentiment that simultaneously comforts the recipient while displacing the blame. It has a way of scratching into one's psyche, leading one to believe, I let that get to me, therefore any hurt feelings I'm experiencing are my fault.

The simple fact of life is that people can be jerks. The interwebs have increased the average person's exposure to jerks by an order of magnitude. If I could have bought stock in internet trolling, I'd have a few planes by now. From the playground to the office to the comment thread, at some point we all have to deal with a generally unpleasant person who derives pleasure from putting others down.

If Psychology 101 taught me anything, it's that those

who lash out at others (trolls, bullies, abusers, whatever your name for them) are unhappy and insecure. But that's only a salve to slap on a sting while the poison gets under your skin and spreads.

I was bullied mercilessly in junior high. I had a tier of tormentors. It wasn't the ruthlessness of the lone individual at the top that got to me, but rather the number of people who jumped on the bully-Barb bandwagon. My main tyrant — a 13-year-old sadist — wasn't the worst of my problems. Sure, he made me dread showing up to school — taunting me with unflattering nicknames like Bar-Barf, putting melted chocolate in my backpack,

and Vaseline in my shoes. But even in the eighth grade I could tell he had issues. So, as irritating as he was, I could write it off as, *That one's not right in the head*.

It wasn't the namecalling or the physical harassment that ruined junior high for me — it was the psychological agony that stemmed not from my being targeted so much as my being tested. I had a close-knit group of girlfriends and a few "best friends." One day, without warning, I found myself unwelcome at the lunch table and told to go away if I was walking too close to the group in the halls; it was as if I'd ceased to exist. It was a collective shunning — I was like a diseased monkey being pushed out of the troop.

Meanwhile, my friends welcomed the new girl I'd introduced to them. She'd been a midyear transplant from another school and, until then, I'd been the only one to reach out and offer my friendship. Even she joined in on the shunning. Too embarrassed to sit alone, I began to take my lunches with a teacher whose work I helped grade.

At the end of the school year, one of my "friends" was passing out invitations from a giant bag on her shoulder for her end-of-the-year party. There had to be at least a hundred of those little scrolls. I thought it was so cool she'd thought to roll them like that. As I stared at the bag expectantly, a girl named Sarah stepped forward to shoo me away and said, "Don't think about asking for an invitation. You're not invited."

That summer, I spent a lot of time crying. My mother and sisters did their best to cheer me up, from deriding my ex-friends to attempting to rebuild my shattered selfesteem. I smiled and pretended their antics were working so that I didn't seem like such a miserable chump.

It wasn't meant to be cruel, what those girls did to me. When school began again, we were all friends like nothing had happened. It wasn't until senior year that one of my besties finally shared the answer to the question that had plagued me for years: Why?

To my surprise, the answer had nothing to do with my failings as a person. "I just wanted to see if I could get them to do what I wanted," she explained. "I told them to stop hanging out with you, just to see if they would."

My friend's revelation conjured images of a documentary I'd seen in which lion cubs tackled and tumbled, unknowingly honing their predatory instincts as they played. I didn't blame my friend for her little power trip; she was just unwittingly preparing herself for the shark tank that is adulthood. What I didn't realize at the time was that rather than being a just victim, I, too, was

growing — developing and hardening my emotional armor.

Sometimes I feel like I live on a little island inside of my head. I'm on this island, and there's a giant ocean between my shore and the physical me that interacts with other people. My survival mechanism is to detach myself emotionally. But, words...they're such good swimmers.

I live my life in the public eye, a lifestyle that invites commentary. It's one thing for someone to disagree with my opinion — I respect and value disparate points of view. That's cool. It's a big world with room for a lot of different ideas. However, when all talk of opinion is tossed aside, when people revert to their scared, confused, still-figuring-out-the-world middle-school personalities and resort to name-calling when there's no objective defense, what's left? "I'm rubber, you're glue, whatever you say bounces off of me and sticks to you"?

"Don't let it get to you," David will say after I read him a message that has already gotten to me.

"I just...I don't understand why," I respond, wiping a tear from the corner of my eye and then huffing at myself for caring what some person on the internet thinks about me. In that moment, I hate myself. Not because a part of me fears that every terrible thing that is written about me might be true, but because I allowed those words passage across my ocean and onto my island. I let them get to me.



## The Jouster



Jeffrey Hedgecock, 43, of Ramona, has built a life around Medieval things.

ontinuing with Jeffrey Hedgecock, 43, of Ramona. Hedgecock makes knightly ▶armour, museum-quality work — imagine 15th-century breastplates, gauntlets, greaves, spaundlers, faulds, and more. Hedgecock says there are two other museum-quality armourers in the U.S., both on the East Coast.

Hedgecock has built a life around Medieval things. He and his wife, Gwen Norwick, are founders of Historic Enterprises. Their outfit sells aforementioned arms and armour, period clothing, lances, saddles, horse armour, everything needed for Medieval man and beast; plus, there's a link to Knight School Joust Training. Mr. Hedgecock is waiting.

Hedgecock and Norwick also produce World Joust Tournaments and among their properties is the Tournament of the Phoenix, which can be found at the Poway Rodeo grounds this Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. And, yes, Hedgecock will joust.

We talked by phone on a recent, foggy Friday morning. I wanted to know, "A family arrives in Poway to see jousting. What can they expect?"

Hedgecock says, "Friday is a preview, goes from 11:00 to 3:00. They can expect an all-day festival Saturday and Sunday. Competition between six of the best knights in the world doing four jousting sessions over two days.

"A session lasts about an hour. We'll do 18 passes. In between two sessions is a combat event. On Saturday we have foot combat, in full armor, with six-foot poleaxes. On Sunday we have a mounted event: six knights in full armour, two teams, battle against each other on horseback."

I'm trying to make a picture of this in my mind. Doesn't come easy. "When did you start

"In 2003, in England," Hedgecock says. "My first tournament was at the Royal Armouries Museum. I'm the only American to have ever been invited to the Royal Armouries. My team, the Order of the Crescent, is the only team to have won the team tournament in three consecutive years."

Okay, got the knights battling picture in focus. Working on the armoured-horses picture. "How do you train horses?"

Hedgecock says, "Very slowly introducing them to armour until they're completely relaxed around it. Not only around someone on foot wearing armour, but someone on their back wearing armour, and then another horse and rider running at them wearing armour. We have to take it rather slowly, it's a very incremental process."

"Is jousting an emerging sport?"

"As a re-creation of an ancient sport, I think it is growing, it is re-emerging," Hedgecock says. "A lot of it is rediscovering the knowledge and technique it takes to do it."

"And how big is the sport of jousting?"

"There's a huge range. There's a relatively limited range of competitive jousting going on worldwide, and especially in the U.S. Most of what's happened in the U.S. has been theatrical jousting or jousting shows that happen at Renaissance fairs. In England, there's probably more competitive jousting, or at least unscripted jousting, than there are jousting shows."

"Is there a world champion?"

Hedgecock says, "There is no central governing body for jousting as a sport, so there's no recognized world championship."

"Is there a jousting event that is regarded as the best, most prestigious?"

Hedgecock says, "I think, within the U.S., ours is probably considered that. One of the things we're trying to do with World Joust Tournaments is create a true national professional jousting league or, at least, a series of tournaments where the best competitors in the world can be assured they'll have competition at a high level to go against. And that the horses will be well trained and it will all be operated on a very professional basis.


"Right now we have the Tournament of the Phoenix, which is a flagship event. We've affiliated with the Tournament of the Silver Lilly in Quebec, Canada, that was in 2010. They just had their third tournament. I competed in the first two and then marshaled the third. Next year we have tournaments booked for France and Poland, and we're in negotiation for two in England."

"How do you practice? Getting all that knight and horse stuff together in order to gallop down a runway with a pole in your hand, how do you practice frequently enough to ever get good at it?"


"It is difficult," Hedgecock says, "because it not only takes a lot of persistence on your part, but you have to gather the people it takes to do it. Even though there are two guys on horseback, you can't put your armour on yourself; you need help. You need someone to hand a lance up to you every time you do a pass. It takes a minimum of four people; that's the two riders plus two helpers. Usually, it's more like four extra people in addition to two jousters."

#### **Game of the Week: No. 7 Otay** Ranch Plays "Catch the Chicken," upends No. 10 Olympian

Chula Vista — In a showdown between undefeated South Bay neighbors on Friday night, Olympian jumped on Otay Ranch in the first half to stay in the section's unbeaten ranks. The 10th-ranked Eagles raced to an early lead and rode that momentum to a 34-20 victory over the seventh-ranked Mustangs.

**T**he Zumba wars broke out at my house the other night.

"Zumba is basically, 'Here's my butt, here's my butt," said Cherie, swinging her booty from side to side.

"I love Zumba," retorted Sophia as she shimmied in reply, "and there's a lot more hip movement and dance to it than that."

"Zumba is basically a dance fitness class that combines all different types of music," offered Ninfa Skezas, owner of Party Fitness Studio in Serra Mesa (619-948-2333, partyzumba.com). "In my opinion, it is one of the best choices for exercising, because we make people feel like they are partying. People don't go to the gym because it gets boring; people are excited to come

to Zumba. We have hip-hop lights and disco balls in the studio. But we're not just dancing; we're working every single muscle that you can think of. Yes, I love to shimmy and shake my hips, but I use many different types of movement in my routines."

Skezas used to drive "almost to Mexico" for Zumba classes; spotting an unfilled niche, she became an instructor. Two years ago, she opened her own studio. "The classes are pretty packed — anywhere from 30 to 60 students," but reservations are not required, and first-timers can try it out for \$8. After that, it's \$10 per 55-minute class, or ten classes for \$80.

Skezas, who grew up in South America, prefers to teach her classes to the "exotic rhythms of salsa, merengue, and bachata." But Alma, director at Queen Bee's in North Park (619-255-5147, queenbeessd.com) told me that one of her instructors, Rosie, "likes to mix in her own music: a little bit of Top 40, some old-school stuff from the '60s, or Michael Jackson. She gets students ranging from 12 years old to 80. Her classes run 30 to 40 people, and she leads from up on a stage, so that people in back can see her. Our other instructor, America, uses more of the Latin sound, with a lot of upbeat Mexican and Caribbean mixes." Alma told me that America's classes are a bit smaller. Prices for both are \$7 for a 60-minute class, or \$6 each if you purchase a ten-class card.

sandiego.com) also goes heavy to the Latin rhythms, "but not one particular style of dance. It's all of them put together. It fits the whole population, old and young — there are no rules; you just go in there and let your body flow. It's not like

ballet, and it's not a routine. Just let the rhythm take you, and even-

The ladies will show each other things, and they'll invite people in and make them comfortable. Clients request the latest pop songs, but we also do traditional merengues and salsas. My personal favorite move is what I call 'happy feet.' It's kind of

like when football players move their

feet really fast while standing in place. We do that before jumping into another move."

Allen says, "Zumba is for dancers and nondancers alike, and it works because the number-one rule of fitness is consistency. The only way to stay consistent at anything is to

have fun doing it, and Zumba is fun and stress-relieving." The first class costs \$5; after that, it's \$10 for a drop-in, \$85 for unlimited monthly classes, or \$85 for ten classes anytime over six months.

Allen also holds private classes (\$100). "I can come to you, or you can come to the studio. I've been doing a lot of bachelorette parties. The events can be customized to higher or lower intensity."

#### The Trail of Torment on Gold Mountain

After the discovery of gold in 1848, young Chinese males began a migration to "Gum Saan" — "Gold Mountain" — the name they

b y gave California. A large Jeff majority were Canton-Smithese. Wearing layers of clothing, they brought

with them a bedroll and only those possessions that could be carried in bamboo baskets. They traveled from the Pearl River Delta to Hong Kong. An organization called the Six Companies paid their fare on a credit-ticket system. As with guilds, the organization provided work, housing, food, medical treatment, even

legal representation. The immigrants had three years to repay the debt from

It's hard to say how many planned to stay in California — or how many would go back to China, then return to California with a family or a new bride. According to the Burlingame Treaty of 1868, Chinese were banned from testifying against, and not allowed to marry, Caucasians; the ratio of Chinese men to women in "Gum Saan" was 20-to-1. Marriage was often the motive to make the trip home.

Young Ah Chee traveled to California in 1870. Throughout the crossing, he remained below decks in cramped quarters — with little food or water amid the pervasive smells of bodily func-

tions and seasickness. He disembarked at San Francisco, where customs officials searched for opium.

In the city, he met 19-year-old Yun



Diego and make her his slave.

Instead of following his group to the gold fields or the Central Pacific Railroad, Ah Chee broke away. He asked friends to write him a letter of introduction: it concluded with the statement that Chee had "always been an honest, sober, and truthful fellow." Ah Chee took the letter south in search of Tun Yow. He hired on as a cook at the Rufus Porter Ranch. Since the Porters worked 16-hour days, a full-time cook was a blessing.

Porter had bought the spread in 1865. He paid \$300 for 160 acres and called it "San Jorge." When his daughter Rufina objected to the pronunciation — "whore-hay" in Spanish — he changed the name to Spring Valley.

The two-room adobe ranch house was 32 feet long and 18 feet wide. Porter added two bedrooms, a dining room, and a kitchen. The timbers and a mahogany staircase came from the Clarissa Andrews, a coal steamer that had run aground at Ballast Point. Stairs led down to the "basement," a hole in the ground where the Porters stored pans of milk and butter in brine — or sometimes Hotel now stands), Horton offered Ah Chee a job in the laundry.

Rufina Porter remembered Ah Chee as a fine cook and a "clean, reliable chap." Since he had been a luxury, the Porters agreed to let him go. Ah Chee took

fled to escape mosquitoes and biting flies. Two trap doors covered the basement's entrance.

Since the ranch was ten rock-riddled miles from town, with no direct route, the ranch had few visitors. A frequent one was Alonzo Horton, founder of New San Diego in 1869. When his block-long, two-story Horton House was completed (where the US Grant

the job at the hotel.

Less than 100 Chinese lived in San Diego in 1872, most either in a fishing village at La Playa or at the foot of Third Street, a location that Ah Chee may have visited often. On one such occasion, he saw Yun Tow. Love bloomed again.

But she was not free. Ung Yu had a brothel on Fourth Street. He ordered Yun Tow to be a prostitute, and when

she refused, he beat her.

At first, Ah Chee was afraid to confront Ung Yu. Yu had many connections in the community and, writes the San Diego Daily Union, "would take powerful vengeance upon him." But when the beatings continued, Ah Chee obtained a marriage license from the county clerk.

On Thursday evening, April 11, 1872, Ah Chee and Tun Yow went to the courthouse. The previous day, John R. Porter — Rufus Porter's brother — and his wife Fanny had arrived at San Diego on the steamer Orizaba. John Porter became the local Justice, and in one of his first acts. secretly married Ah Chee and Tun Yow. To avoid suspicion, the couple agreed that she should remain at the brothel until they could take the next steamer to San Francisco.

But the marriage wasn't a secret. The next day, the Daily Union announced in the "vital statistics" column that the wedding had taken place. Ung Yu read the paper and punished Yun Tow.

That night, desperate to free her, Ah Chee borrowed a carriage from Hinton & Gallagher's livery stable,







no business to look over the house," wrote Rufina. "Mother and I had to tell some lies to get rid of them."

The men went outside, searched the barn, wagon shed, and henhouses, but did not find "our little Chinese bride." Tun Yow, who had experienced unthinkable wrongs since coming to "Gold Mountain," emerged from the hole quivering with fear. The women assured her that she'd be safe from now on. Rufus drove her to his brother's house, and she stayed with John and his wife Fanny until the next steamer arrived.

In a rare burst of compassion, on April 16, the Daily Union asked: "Is not the law strong enough to protect these poor people? Can it be twisted to return to slavery and infamy this man's lawful wife?"

The next day, the paper announced that Ah Chee and Tun Yow had sailed away. At least six men had escorted them in several carriages to the wharf, where the couple boarded a steamer for Los Angeles. "At that city they have friends who will care for them a day or two when they will be sent by stage to San Jose, where they hope to live together in peace and happiness." The Daily *Union* praised the Porters and John Hinton. "There will be a big mark set down to their credit in the books of the recording angel."

#### Happily ever after?

Accounts vary.

Rufus Porter claimed the couple made it to San Jose and ran a laundry under assumed names. When it burned down, they converted the building to a restaurant.

Interviewed in 1936, Rufina Porter said that Ah Chee and Tun Yow never made it to the steamer. "Their families were of different castes, or tongs, so there was great opposition to the marriage and they probably killed [Ah Chee]. We did all we could to help them, but it was no use."

Those who side with Rufina claim that in both instances — the marriage and plans for escape — the Daily Union had publicized their intentions, which enabled Ung Yu to track them down.

Jim Van Meter, director of the Bancroft House, suggests a "Door Number Three" option: Maybe the young couple and the Porters had learned something from the published wedding announcement, and had given the Daily Union a false itinerary. They sailed on a different date, to a different port, and fled to new lives. ■







it to him.

There were early signs of the debacle. In 2004, Shames proposed a new organization, Internet Consumers' Action Network, Inc. (ICAN), a nonprofit that would work with a private organization to be owned by Shames. "Michael is considering launching a new form of UCAN and ditching us," said a key employee in an email. A person high in the organization wondered if Shames intended to merge his organization with San Francisco's watchdog, the Utility Reform Network (TURN), to free himself up to pursue fat profits through ICAN's connection to his private company. "Michael is notorious for doing what he wants with ucan's money," said a top official in an email.

"Shames was hardly ever in the office," says a forCITY LIGHTS

mer employee. "When he did show up, it was unannounced." For years, a demoralized staff wondered what he was plotting.

On March 4, 2011, the board was informed of the alleged financial misconduct, including the "Comsumers" accounts. Thirteen days later, Shames warned employees that if they didn't stop complaining to the board, he would dissolve UCAN, and the board would go along. The board hired attorney Paul Dostart, a forensic accountant, who reported on June 8, 2011, that he could not locate the misspelled account balances on the UCAN books.

But on August 24, 2011, Dostart claimed to whistleblower Peffer that the misspelled accounts had been tied back to UCAN's financial records and the "account name misspellings were inadvertent oversights."


Peffer replied disdainfully that six such mis-

spelled accounts had now been traced to five separate financial institutions. While Dostart had claimed that the accounts involved only nominal amounts, there was one for more than \$262,000.

Whistle-blower Langley says it strains credulity to believe that these accounts could have been traced in less than three months. Moreover, UCAN management still has not recovered records of misspelled accounts that landed in financial institutions prior to 2008 and recently sent out letters to retrieve them. Mike Aguirre, attorney for the whistle-blowers, was told by a UCAN accountant that there was only a spot check of the misspelled accounts — not a full audit. The board "decided to go into dissolution rather than do an audit," says Aguirre.

On September 22, 2011, Dostart wrote to Belinda Johns of the Attorney Gen-

eral's Registry of Charitable Trusts. Dostart said that the board had decided on liquidation — hopefully in a deal that would permit TURN to take over UCAN assets without acquiring possible large liabilities.

It looked then as if Shames had won: UCAN would be dissolved, the whistle-blowers fired, their allegations buried, and the board let off the hook. But TURN apparently smelled a rat, and so did the United States attorney's office. In February of this year, UCAN filed for dissolution and claimed it would cooperate with the United States attorney's investigation. But the dissolution attempt failed, and the probe is now intensifying.

Dostart won't com-

ment. Richard Kipperman, court-appointed receiver who declared that he had found no wrongdoing, says the court never ordered him to do a forensic audit. The United States attormey may have to locate those "Comsumers" accounts.

### **Move that** umbrella

Orca experts continue to doubt SeaWorld story Bay Park — Dr. Ingrid N. Visser, an orca expert and founder of the Orca **Research Trust, continues** to ponder the origin of a wound suffered on the lower mandible of Nakai, one of the "killer whales" that form the backbone of SeaWorld San Diego's menagerie.

As reported on the blog of Outside magazine correspondent Tim Zimmerman, Visser traveled to San Diego to attempt to observe Nakai shortly after news of his injury broke. While here, she captured perhaps the most graphic photo of Nakai's wound that has been made publicly available.... Based on the available photos at the time. Visser said she believed the injury could have been caused by a sharp edge, such as are found at the gates between the different holding pens where the orcas are kept between shows, and between those pens and the main performance tank.

On arrival, Visser claims to have been obstructed in her investigation by Sea-World staff.

"When I was in the park,

the trainers and security guards were not happy with me trying to photograph Nakai and had me stop photographing from certain points," writes Visser. "They obscured other observation points by moving sun umbrellas and outdoor gas heaters in front of viewing spots, and they moved Nakai to prevent me taking photos at all. A good chunk of the money has come from firms with a stake in public school construction projects, but the biggest donor was Qualcomm billionaire Irwin Jacobs of La Jolla; he and his wife Joan kicked in a total of \$80,000 on September 29.

The Jacobs donation marks yet another bigmoney contribution during what is shaping up as the busiest political season yet for the controversial Democrat, who has given \$2 million to support the reelection of Barack Obama while at the same time endorsing **GOP** city councilman Carl DeMaio's bid to become mayor of San Diego.

On the other side of the issue from Jacobs is R.B. "Buzz" Woolley, founder of the Jacobs-backed Voice of San Diego online news site. Woolley gave \$10,000 to oppose Prop Z on September 13, according to the No on Z committee's disclosure filing.

Few Asians among local voters

Asians comprise the fastest-growing ethnic group in San Diego, with their population numbers rising 39 percent throughout the county and 24 percent within San Diego's city limits over the past decade, according to the coalition.

While their population is growing, however, participation in politics is significantly below the national

In the spirit of cooperation, we propose that both sides promptly appear in front of Judge Taylor to request the City be permitted to conduct stormwater maintenance work in the Tijuana River Valley channels before February 2013, in order to reduce the risk to residents."



Brand writes in an October 4 letter to the board of trustees that the motivation for his recommendation is that he has asked the committee members to fill out conflict-of-interest forms and they have not. Your statement that something was going on with the [committee] and you were going to make us fill out 700 forms was out of line...."

This is regarding the music article titled "Homegrown" by Dave Good, August 16. There are many San Diegans who grew up listening to 101 KGB-FM throughout the 1970s and beyond. Rock DJs Jim McInnes (who joined KGB-FM in 1974) and Jeff Prescott (in August 1975) are legendary. They were the voice of reason, charm, and personality, including real passion, working and representing KGB-FM. There were there at the right time. Even as a 13-year-old kid, I could relate to their sense of humor and the topics of the day. They could really make the younger KGB listeners feel good about themselves and, just as important, they would play pure rock music, classic '60s and current '70s, as rock was evolving into progressive heavy rock. KGB also took pride in their antidisco movement. I always felt a connection with 101 KGB-FM as a rock station. They did everything right on. of San Diego. The song that started it all was titled "Chula Vista," written by Dougl Drill. The band was Rose and the Arrangements. Other song favorites were "Spring Valley Sally" on Homegrown 1, recorded by Montezuma's Revenge, and "Black's Beach," by the Island (written by Barry Fox), "Logan Avenue Blues," by Good News (written by J. Noone and Ted Picor), "Gypsies from Bonsall," by Larry Weir, "Dago from Diego" and "I Can See the Point," performed by Pete Filacio and the Fantasy Band (who just happens to be my uncle, by the way, and knows Jim McInnes). Yes, indeed, the Homegrown albums are legendary and are very important to San Diego history.

I would like to include the KGB Chicken, who was hatched in the spring of 1974, and performed with Elvis Presley in concert in 1976. Also, at the Sports Arena in 1976, the KGB chicken was jailed for disturbing the peace at an Aerosmith concert. He is mostly known for his humourous acts during the Padres games, even though he would leave KGB before 1980 and become "The Chicken," his trademark design, not KGB's, though he still performed throughout the 1980s. In fact, the chicken was rehatched out of a giant egg at a Padres game — I believe in 1984. To most San Diegans, he will forever be known as the KGB chicken. That is, if you grew up with him.

Last, but not least, what sets KGB apart from all the rest is the spectacular KGB sky shows. They were the first to broadcast live and have synchronized rock music with a massive fireworks display, this nostalgic tradition belonging to San Diego since April of 1976. Anyone who ever attended a rock concert and KGB sky show combined at the stadium will always remember how epic it was. The atmosphere was a rare sight to behold. As the day turned into night, it was a never-ending party for 60,000 concert-goers inside the stadium, including the grass playing field that turned into a sea of people — a scenario you could never forget. Also, the parking lot was transformed into party central, the apex of all parties, a place where you had the freedom to barbecue, bring your own coolers of ice-cold beer (kegs included), hang out with people you just met and share food, drink and nice stories. It's incredible how a stadium parking lot can offer everlasting memories.

In conclusion, even though times have changed, the sky shows continue to be spectacular. Take part in San Diego tradition and nostalgia, courtesy of 101 KGB-FM.



The glacier-fed, sapphire-blue waters of Lake Tekapo on New Zealand's South Island are too cold to swim in. But the area abounds with great hikes.

### Lake Tekapo, **New Zealand**

For those looking for an off-the-beatenpath excursion in New Zealand, I'd recommend visiting Lake Tekapo, in the center of the country's South Island. The small town is a cluster of homes and motels at the south end of the striking, sapphire-blue glacier-fed lake.

At an elevation of 2300 feet and bordering the Southern Alps, it's a dry, barren place ideal for biking or hiking.

Although the large lake offers ample space for swimming, kayaking, and boating, few people venture in due to the

frigid temperature of the water. Instead, I'd suggest hiking the scenic Mt. John Walkway.

The full trail is a three-hour loop; however, following the trail in a clockwise direction gets you to the summit in about an hour. At the top, you're rewarded with 360-degree views of Lake Tekapo, the majestic Southern Alps, and the expansive Mackenzie Basin flats. Due to the lack of trees and shrubs, you can see every valley and peak the terrain has to offer. Look carefully and you may be able to see Mt. Cook, the highest peak in the southern hemisphere.

If you've reached the top and found yourself lacking in nourishment, have no worries. Perched at the top of the peak is the Astro Café, run in conjunction with the Mt. John Observatory. With only windows for walls, the café offers one of the best views you may ever find yourself dining with.

And if hiking up in the heat of the day is not your thing, venture up at night, when the Mt. John Observatory is open and works with the local Earth & Sky tour company. Lake Tekapo is located in the heart of the Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve and offers

unparalleled views of the southern night sky. Check out a more majestic Milky Way than you'll find in the northern hemisphere, or the Southern Cross, visible only when "down under."

New Zealand is known for its adventure sports, and Lake Tekapo is no exception. Before you journey to the tourist hotspots, check out this less-crowded alternative to enjoy the majestic beauty that is Aotearoa, New Zealand.



San Diego Outdoors with the Canyoneers

#### **CABRILLO NATIONAL MONUMENT'S BAYSIDE TRAIL**

This spectacular hike showcases San Diego's skyline, Coronado, and the bay.

**Distance from downtown San Diego:** 15 miles. Allow 26 minutes. Take SR-163 north to I-8 west. Turn left on Sunset Cliffs Blvd. at the end of the freeway. Drive 0.6 mile, turn left on Voltaire Street, and then right on Catalina Blvd. after 0.7 mile. After 2.7 miles, merge with Cabrillo Memorial Drive and follow it 2.5 miles to the monument. Entrance fee or National Parks Pass required. Facilities. • **Hiking length:** 1.86 miles round trip. • **Difficulty:** Easy. Elevation loss/gain of 340 feet.



Cabrillo National Monument's Bayside Trail offers views that stretch into Mexico and out to the Cuyamaca Mountains, plus up-close viewing of pit-stopping migratory birds.


The view from the Bayside Trail at Cabrillo National Monument is stunningly beautiful. Visible from this trail are downtown San

Diego, Coronado, San Diego Bay, and the Pacific Ocean. Whether you are visiting San Diego for the first time or are a lifelong San Diegan who has never made it all the way down Point Loma, this trail is a wonderful way to learn a little bit about the nature and history of the area. The trail is perfect for all ages and hiking abilities since it is a scant 1.86 miles round trip. But don't be fooled by the length. It is still a good workout, as the hike back up the trail is all uphill with a 340-foot elevation gain.

There are interpretive signs along the trail identifying many of the common plants that may be seen on the hike. The signs also highlight the natural history and military importance of Point Loma and San Diego Bay and provide a good opportunity to take a break while climbing the slope back up.

The Bayside Trail is a perfect way to get acquainted with the coastal sage scrub ecosystem. This special habitat is becoming increasingly rare due to development in Southern California. On this trail, however, one can experience the plants and animals that call the sage scrub habitat home. Black sage, California sunflower, California sagebrush, laurel sumac, and lemonade berry are some of the common plants that are encountered. The best time to view wildflowers in this sage scrub community is February through May.

Point Loma is an important avian stopover on the Pacific Flyway. This means that during the spring and fall migration there are lots of bird species that may be viewed, many of which do not make their home in San Diego during the



rest of the year. So, be sure to bring your binoculars! Binoculars are also helpful when viewing the marine birds just offshore and the occasional sea lion that swims up to the fishing boats below.

For history buffs, the Bayside Trail winds past several military bunkers that were part of the defense system used to protect San Diego Bay during World Wars I and II. Point Loma is still important to the military and the entrance to the monument is on land belonging to the Department of the Navy. Pay attention to the time while on the trail. The National Monument

closes at 4 p.m. and the exit gate through the military base closes at 5 p.m. Leave time to explore the visitor center to learn about Juan Rodríguez Cabrillo, who discovered San Diego Bay in 1542.

Canyoneers are San Diego Natural History Museum volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks that teach appreciation for the great outdoors. For a schedule of free public hikes, refer to the San Diego Natural History Museum website.

the city was able to create and nurture one of the finest orchestras in the world. Time favorably compared Cleveland Orchestra to many of the most noteworthy orchestras of Central Europe. During the summer, the orchestra performs outdoors at the Blossom Music Festival, inside the Cuyahoga Valley National Park. You can bring picnic coolers, as well as purchase food and wine there. The lawn seating is arranged on a hill, so it's nature's amphitheater seating with no obstructed views of the musicians.

The Cleveland Museum of Art's permanent collections are always free to the public, including their German and Austrian Medieval and Renaissance suits of armor and German and Austrian Baroque sculpture.

Another place in Cleveland that features free Prussian art is historic Lake View Cemetery. Lake View is one of the first cemeteries of the Victorian era that broke away from the sterile Colonial-era layout to start the "garden cemetery" trend. Garden cemeteries became the place to promenade, to picnic, and to view fine marble statuary.

Lake View was laid out by Adolph Strauch, a renowned Prussian landscape architect. The cemetery has an impressive monument dedicated to assassinated president James A. Garfield. It's also the final resting place of John D. Rockefeller, Eliot Ness, and Carl B. Stokes; members of President Lincoln's cabinet, Civil War generals, and Revolutionary War soldiers.







San Diego Reader: What is your favorite sub*ject on which to preach?* 

Pastor Wilbert Miller: I would preach that in fact there is a free lunch for all people. We live in a culture that always looks for the fine print. Many people think, especially in the church,

that this is only for people who are good, perfect, and think a certain way about social issues, whatever that might be. It is a free lunch for everybody; we are all undeserving and we all get that free lunch, no matter who we are. In our tradition, the free lunch is all about the radical nature of God's grace....

SDR: What is your main concern as member of the clergy? **PW**: Cleary the church is no longer the institution it used to be. We're no longer the place where everyone goes Sunday morning, or to the synagogue Saturday. There are so many opportunities and options. My concern becomes that especially we pastors try to cater to

that because we know that people church-shop today... The church needs to commit itself to what Christ is about, and I think that's not a popular message in our culture, to care for the poor, the hungry, the dying. That's not always an exciting or happy message.

**SDR**: Why Lutheran?

PW: It's what I was born in, but I really cherish the gift of grace and that we are saved by the love of God through Christ Jesus, and not by what we do. That is the issue on which Lutherans rise or fall. I don't' think Lutherans are the perfect denomination, but that's what rings true, day in and day out. We are justified by the grace of God

and not by what we do. It makes so much sense to me. **SDR**: What is the mission of your church?

**PW**: We are getting ready to celebrate our 125th anniversary. We're the oldest Lutheran church in Southern California. In 2013 we will celebrate that anniversary. We've always been downtown, and for our mission, we say we are the heart of Christ in the heart of the city. And so that I really think the history of this congregation has been to keep our doors open to all people.

SDR: Where do you go when

PW: I believe it's up to God who gets into heaven. My deepest prayer, because

Pastor Wilbert Miller believes "We are all undeserving, [yet] we all get that free lunch, no matter who we are."

I know myself best, is that God is merciful. That is my prayer. I certainly don't feel that I deserve to be in heaven.... I'm fearful that any answer I give to that question minimizes the wonder of God's grace.

SDR: Is heaven the only option for people? Or is there a place of punishment that they could go to?

PW: I think God works that out. What I see in the world, my daily experience starts with me. I know I'm a sinner, so I don't need to point my finger at others. My worldview is that we are fallen, we are broken, and we are selfish. The world revolves around us and our ideas of what's perfect. But my belief is that Gods' view is much bigger than my little worldview.



# Feast!

### In my family, the family meal was sacrosanct.

No matter what was going on or how busy you were with school, work, or friends, when dinnertime rolled around, you were expected to be there or be prepared to explain yourself.

All of us participated in preparations: the table was always nicely set, utensils and napkins in their proper place. The table was Formica, and the plates were melamine, but no matter, it was set daily as if we were expecting the president of the United States to show up.

My mother, an excellent baker who learned the trade in her father's shop, was not an especially adept cook. It didn't matter, we knew at the end of the meal we'd be treated to dessert. Sometimes it was as simple as fresh fruit, but more often than not, she'd have one of her lighter-thanair angel food cakes or her peanut butter cookies studded with whole nuts.

It wasn't just a means to fill your stomach; this was our family's time to regroup, to come together and talk, to discuss current events, school, or the latest neighborhood gossip. Sometimes we fought during dinner, but more often we laughed.

Some restaurants bring the spirit of family dinnertime back to my mind — places where food is created with care, where the service is warm and welcoming, and where you can relax and reconnect with family and friends. — Mary Beth Abate

For Wade Hageman, making pizzas at his Blue Ribbon Artisan Pizza isn't so different from his former days as executive chef at Blanca in Solana Beach. He still uses fresh, locally sourced ingredients as well as house-made fresh mozzarella, rich, garlicky tomato sauce, and fennel sausage. The dough is fermented for three days and baked a few minutes longer than traditional Neapolitan pizza, giving it a thin, crackling crisp crust and soft crumb.

Adornments are simple and high quality, from the brightly flavored Signature pizza topped with fresh mozzarella, ricotta, lemon zest, red onion, basil, and extra virgin olive oil, to the Staff Favorite (house

tomato sauce, sausage, basil, Parmigiano Reggiano, and a drizzle of heavy cream).

Popular and delicious starters include local sweet-corn soup; a Caesar salad that uses heirloom Little Gem romaine, Parmigiano Reggiano, and garlicky bread crumbs; and the yellowtail tuna crudo, fresh local yellowtail, Haas avocado, ruby grapefruit, and lemon olive oil.

There's only one des-

sert on the menu, but try to save room for it. It's a sinful butterscotch pudding, smooth and creamy under its topping of salted caramel and whipped cream. Don't feel guilty if you decide not to share.

Get your borscht and mushroom pierogi fix during Polish week; dig into layers of savory ground beef, ripe plantain, and tomato sauce in a traditional Puerto Rican *pastelón de platano*; or relish a spicy Portuguese *bacalhoada*, chunky-full of salt cod, potatoes, onions, and olives.

Tried and true sand-wich faves include a lovely turkey, pear, and brie on sturdy bread with a good schmear of cranberry aioli and a delectable grilled-vegetable version dressed in an addictive, earthy walnut spread.

Eggs à la Africana (eggs and fava beans topped with a tangy yogurt sauce), biscuits and eggs smothered in Italian sausage gravy, and red velvet pancakes are big draws for the weekend brunch crowd.

If you're lucky enough to get there before Hanna's famous ginger carrot cake sells out, be sure to grab a slice. It's worth every moist, spicy, cream-cheesy bite.

### **Eclipse Chocolat**



The tiny, comfy café offers dessert platters combining unexpected flavors, like the chocolate olive oil fondue, a vegan-friendly combo with 72 percent chocolate, blood orange olive oil, fresh fruit, candied mango, and a sugared torta; or the tasting platter, a collection of four petite chocolate desserts featuring seasonal ingredients that changes every six weeks.

Crème fraîche cupcakes, in dark chocolate or vanilla butter cake, feature an exotic caramel or cream filling and a rich ganache glaze in an assortment of 24 rotating flavors.

Decadent drinking chocolates and mochas mingle dark, milk, or white chocolate and infusions of rosemary/mint, chilies/burnt caramel, or vanilla/orange peel. Two pillowysoft house-made vanillabean marshmallows come on the side.

On weekends, a Chocolate Brunch showcases savory small plates infused with caramel, chocolate, or vanilla bean, available à la carte or in three- or fourcourse combos. Crispy rosemary potatoes, roasted golden brown, sprinkled with serrano sea salt and chili-burnt caramel hollandaise, are a standout, as is the chocolate-glazed bacon waffle or the three & three scramble — three eggs plus three add-ins (sub egg whites at no extra charge). Brunch standbys, the mimosa and bloody Mary, are tweaked Eclipse





style as well. My favorite is made with KARMA champagne and their deservedly popular lavender vanillabean lemonade.

A small selection of wines is available (by the glass or half bottle), as is bottled beer, excellent espresso drinks, and a nice variety of regular and herbal teas.

### d Bar Desserts

3930 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-299-3227, dbarsandiego.com

Dessert becomes performance art at d Bar Desserts, sort of a pastry chef's version of a sushi bar. The long, sleek counter runs the length of the room and affords a bird's eye view of chef Keegan Gerhard or one of his talented staff plating your picture-perfect dessert.

The Cake and Shake is three layers of moist chocolate goodness under a not-too-sweet Madagascar chocolate frosting and your choice of a thick, frosty chocolate, vanilla, or raspberry shake or malt. Milk and Cookies (chocolate chunk, peanut butter bull's eye, snicker doodle, and oatmeal raisin) are popular. So is the Molten Chocolate Thingy that Everyone Has, pairing the aforementioned molten thingy with raspberry compote and pistachio ice cream.

As much as I love a good chocolate dessert, I usually pick one of the seasonal fruit desserts. Here, local produce shines, as in Late Summer Porn: roasted California peaches, buttermilk panna cotta, sweetcorn ice cream, and whitepeach sorbet.

Savory small plates are reasonably priced and shareable. My favorite is the Southern Fried Belgian, a moist, crispy chicken breast sandwiched between cheesy, herby Belgian waffles. Pudgy, juicy grilled Kobe sliders in a brioche bun are tasty, too, under their drunken onion and white cheddar toppings.

Libations haven't been overlooked amid the sweets — a Peppermelon (Bombay gin, black pepper, honey, and watermelon) will cool you off on the hottest day. The beer and wine lists are short and uncomplicated; nearly all wines are available by both the glass and bottle.

#### **Local Habit**

Using local organic produce, house-cured meats, and homemade breads, Local Habit's seasonally changing bill of fare features Napolitano-style pizzas, small plates, salads, and sandwiches. Nearly all the pizzas can be made glutenfree, and there are a surprising variety of vegetarian and vegan options on the fussfree menu.









I love the simplicity of the thin, crisp-crusted pizzas; most have only three or four toppings. Mushrooms with fresh herbs and Spring Hill Cheese Curd is a favorite; earthy criminis pair nicely with grassy parsley and aromatic basil. Pecan Island Rabbit Gumbo is a deeply savory nod to chef Nick Brune's childhood days hunting and cooking with his father in Louisiana. Plump ricotta dumplings in a vivacious tomato-andbasil reduction are another standout.

Twelve taps serve San Diego beers on a rotating basis, including a weekly cask offering and a selection of bottled beers and hard ciders. Here, too, you can find gluten-free choices, such as New Planet's Tread Lightly Ale and Off Grid Pale. The short wine list features moderately priced bottles from family-owned California wineries.

### Table 926

926 Turquoise Street, Pacific Beach, 858-539-0926, table926.com

San Diego native Matt Richman, co-owner and executive chef of Table 926, keeps his menu short and focused. A half dozen or so starters and entrées comprise the regular rotation. Several ingredient-driven daily specials round it out.

Crowd-favorite appetizers include delectable, nutty-tasting roasted brussels sprouts, lightly charred

and dressed in a bright Dijon white anchovy vinaigrette and a shower of Parmesan; and Venus clams, fennel confit, and Spanish chorizo steamed in a white wine-butter sauce.

Luscious pork cheeks are given a spicy, tangy glaze of tamarind and guajillo chilies, then nestled into a bed of sautéed bitter greens and creamy polenta. Ribeyes are aged in-house and grilled, accompanied by aromatic herbes de Provence frites and a sparkling watercress and picholine olive salad.

Sweet endings are fun and unexpected — raspberry, Nutella, and vanilla ice creams, perched on roasted bananas, and little bowls of cherries, pistachios, chocolate sauce, and whipped cream on the side make for a do-it-yourself banana split. Pineapple and sweet onion are baked into the Opposite Day Cake; coconut-marshmallow sorbet and smokedpaprika syrup push it into the decidedly offbeat, but somehow it works. Sweet, savory, and spicy.

A handful of local beers are on tap, a dozen or so more are available in bottles. The wine list is fairly short and moderately priced. Several are available by the glass.

### Café 21

2736 Adams Avenue, University Heights, 619-640-2121 750 Fifth Avenue, Gaslamp, 619-7950721, cafe-21.com

Leyla and Alex Javado may have created the perfect little neighborhood restaurants in their American-Azeri fusion Café 21. It is one of the few restaurants that can get me excited about salad. Too often, they're a limp, bland afterthought. Not so, here. Lightly roasted grapes, sliced almonds, and goat cheese are piled on mixed greens and napped with tangy/sweet honey balsamic vinaigrette. Also lovely is the signature strawberry salad, with pistachios and goat cheese tossed in a not-toosweet raspberry vinaigrette.

Appetizers are huge and shareable. Chicken, mozzarella, and apricot jelly stuffed Cristo Crepes are a flavor explosion. Earthy, chewy-tender pierogies take me back to the south side of Milwaukee, where Polish grandmas turn them out by the hundreds.

Entrées include several elaborately stuffed dishes: chicken breast, pork chops, cabbage rolls, and lambstuffed pasta are ethereal comfort foods. Accompaniments are given thoughtful treatment as well; rice pilafs are studded with nuts and dried fruits, complemented by delectable saffron or garlic cream sauces.

For dessert, seasonal fruit cobbler is always delicious, as is the banana cake topped with apricots. ■

### If you're among the growing number of people who, like me, work from home,

chances are there have been days when you've emerged from your den of productivity in search of sustenance, only to find that your favorite corner café was closed. Most restaurants cater to nine-to-fivers, whose lunchtimes fit neatly between 12 and 2 p.m. But just because you might not be ready for a break until the blue hour (the not-quite lunchtime, but not-yet dinner period), doesn't mean you have to rely on drive-thrus and grocery-store deli counters. Here's a roundup of eateries that are open when you, the hardworking foodie freelancer, need them to be. — *Barbarella* 

### Snooze, an A.M. Eatery

This breakfast-centric bistro is open at 6:30 a.m. every day of the week to greet you with an elaborate latte or a restorative cocktail such as the Hound Dog, with citrus vodka, grapefruit juice, and raspberry liqueur. After you select whether you want to be bright-eyed or buzzed, choose from an array of re-imagined breakfast classics, from the savory Breakfast Pot Pie (with house-made rosemary sausage) or Chilaquiles Benedict (carne asada atop a "cheesy, saucy, tortilla stack," Niman Ranch eggs, smoked cheddar hollandaise, fresh salsa, and cotija cheese) to the sweet and oh-so-decadent Pineapple Upside Down Pancakes or Sweet

Potato Pancakes topped with house-made caramel, pecans, and ginger butter. Bonus: you don't have to feed the meters until 8 a.m.

#### The Mission

Hip, urban, and with three locations from the shore to downtown, the Mission is open by 7 a.m., which makes it a great go-to for early-morning meetings with "conscientious cuisine." My favorite dish is the Breakfast Burritos — two tamale-sized egg-and-cheese burritos served on a plate with black beans. But

no visit is complete without a bite of a strawberry, banana, and granola pancake (if you can't handle a stack, you can order just one pancake to share). Other sure-fire dishes are the Mission Rosemary (crispy rosemary potatoes, scrambled eggs, rosemary bread) and the Zen Breakfast (egg whites, tofu, brown rice, grilled veggies, and a savory tamari-based sauce).



My favorite flatbread is the Italian Stallion, with sweet sausage, big hunks of peppers in the sauce, provolone cheese, and basil. The grilled asparagus is simple but satisfying (it's a side, but I always get it as an appetizer). Another fun small plate to share is the Happy Dogs, which are veggie dogs wrapped in puff pastry with brie cheese.

### Hacienda de Vega

The best time to visit this tranquil oasis is late afternoon on a weekday, just as the sun begins to relent. Beat the happyhour crowd by arriving at 3 or 4 p.m. and ordering the best margarita in the

county (that's right, I'm calling it), the Hacienda Margarita — a refreshing, spicy concoction containing tamarindo and a hunk of fresh jicama, served in a chili-salt rimmed glass. Sit back and listen to the relaxing sound of water cascading off the roof of the hacienda and into a small pond. Little birds scampering through potted plants and walls of violet bougainvillea only add to the wonderment and the Hacienda's Mexico Cityinfluenced menu never disappoints.

### **Raglan Public** House

1851 Bacon Street, Ocean Beach, 619-794-2304, raglanpublichouse.com I'm beginning to think that it's illegal to display a timekeeping device in Ocean Beach. At any time from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. every day, you can stroll into this upscale burger bar inspired

by New Zealand's "unique culture and friendly attitude." The monstrous burgers are made with 100 percent grass-fed beef, and feature exotic topping combos, as with the Sheilas Cracked (topped with fried egg, edam cheese, and beetroot). Sit outside, nibble on some Kumara fries (sweet-potato fries with blue cheese), enjoy a beer or creative cocktail, and observe OBceans in their native habitat.

But my favorite is the falafel version, crispy meatballsized falafel balls, mixed veggies and garlic yogurt sauce, all swathed in a soft flatbread. For even speedier service, you can order online.

### **Carnitas Snack** Shack

2632 University Avenue, North Park, 619-294-7675, carnitassnackshack.

Named for the owners' beloved pet mini pig, Carnitas, the shack is exceptionally pork-centric. The menu (ten items written on the chalkboard outside) changes daily, depending on what's fresh at the farmers' markets that day.

Open till midnight, and now with an expanded patio, the shack provides perfect post-drink nosh fare, such as the Pork Belly Hash Burrito or the triple pork sandwich (breaded pork schnitzel, pulled pork, and bacon, with pickle relish and shack aioli). Vegetarians are not entirely forgotten — there's always at least one meat-free dish, such as the Stuffed Tomato (potato, onion, corn, carrot, zucchini, and more).

### **Tajima**

For a satisfying meal, add a takana (Japanese spicy pickled leaves) rice ball, which bursts with flavor.



### Napizza

You can sit up close to the band of crazy cooks clanging pans, among corrugated iron and palm-frond palapas, and order big (like the shrimp sampler for nearly 50 bucks) or small. My favorite: smoked marlin taco for \$3. And it's pretty

filling. And, down here, people talk to you! Best time: sunset, Thursday onward.

### Mezzah

"We are Iraqi Christians, but our tapas are mainly Lebanese," the owner Ammar told me. "The Lebanese love to snack on different tapas, to have a drink, and socialize." Classy feeling here. Pretty big tapas, too. Around \$7 for dishes such as grilled quail, sherhaat (steak medallions), and, my fave, fetoosh, a Lebanese salad that's huge. Nice







My favorite Italian. This is a new, hard-to-find place started by an Italian family with deep South Bay roots. This place is full of life — Italian style: talk, sisters, husbands, cooks, wives rolling gnocchi pastries out on the table, '50s Italian music, like "Volare," as they create it all from scratch right here. Yes, it's totally standard stuff, but in this atmosphere, what else? And they're trying hard to cook healthy. They make their own sausages from turkey, meatballs that (they swear!) are "91 percent lean." My fave: the sizzling eggplant dish (\$10).

### **Urban India**

It was the \$2 Stone IPA happy-hour draft pints that got me coming here. That's unbeatable. The place is a bit of a barn — orangey, woody, bricky, though they have filled it with Indian art, Buddha heads, and big-screen TVs showing sports. You know it's Indian because half the screens are showing cricket. The young Sikhs running it are part of the "new India" urban, cool, on the make. Good standard Indian fare. Best happy-hour deal: the chicken tikka, sizzlin' and crackling on a black iron platter for around six bucks.

### Sótano Suizo ("Swiss Cellar")

9415 Avenida Paseo de Los Héroes, Zona Rio, Tijuana, 011-52-664-684-88-34, sotanosuizo.com

My favorite hot dog. It's an eight-inch craggy-crusted baguette loaded with a giant, peppery Hungarian wiener under a nest of crispy candied onions, tomato chunks, a crooked

line of yellow mustard with red balls dotted along it so it looks like a coral snake, plus unmelted Swiss cheese licking over the edges. The Swiss guy who created this dawg is René Bösiger. Now he's created his own beer, too. Take friends, take time. It's worth the trip.

My fave food truck. The first thing you've gotta love about these Brits is that they supply picnic blankets so you can chow down beside the truck. Then, the food's interesting: say, smoked salmon on flatbread with sour cream, lemon, and potato salad; or beer-battered fish and chips; or spiced ground lamb on salad leaves. And dessert? compote with crumbled meringue and fresh mint. Someone should give these Brit brothers, Dave and Kevin Keylock, a knighthood.





Came home, thought, Hey, why not just try something new on the streets of my hometown? Result: Here he is cooking by an open-fire mesquite grill. Makes tacos like... ceviche of sole blackened

on the grill, then slapped on a messy red layer of toasted chilies, peanuts, squash, and roasted habaneros in olive oil. Out of this world? Grab his food before some five-star restaurant grabs him.

### Tiger! Tiger! **Tavern**

My favorite tavern. Lee Chase and Jeff Motch of Blind Lady Tavern started this up last year as part of their campaign "to have a meeting place like this every two or three blocks." (Motch's words.) Sure seems to be working in this woody, frontierlooking barn. Friday nights are ker-razy. Menu's kind of honest, Gold Rush-era, sandwichy, German sausagey, Vietnamese fusion. And it's coupled with a zillion interesting beers and baristas interested in pairing you with them. Foodwise, my fave is the oyster po' boy sandwich. Tasty, creamy, and tangy with pickled chili and pickles. Those oysters squish through in every bite.

### Meijo Sushi

My favorite Japanese sushi joint: The (mostly Vietnamese) people who run it are a fun crowd. They keep things buzzing. They tell jokes. And (bottom line) they're cheap. I've had sushi mix — five different kinds of fish flesh on rice, plus nine sushi rolls, for about nine bucks. Or six-buck specials, such as teriyaki chicken with fried gyoza, or shrimp and beef curry. That and a bottle of sake will get you out, belly full, for around \$10. The formula works: This place always seems to have a cheery crowd of locals, and the shelves bulge with those masu boxes that regulars drink sake out of.



# Nowadays, I spend much of my time eating in restaurants or locked up in my office documenting those experiences.

But before I wrote my first word about food, most of my time was spent in the kitchen. I spent over a decade learning about and practicing the culinary arts. Back then, San Diego had far fewer gourmet restaurants, and even they were fairly pedestrian. Of those that were exploring more eclectic cuisines, esoteric ingredients, and cutting-edge techniques, nearly all of them were priced far out of my range. I'm happy to say that, over the past several years, gourmet fare has become far more accessible for everyday diners, inching its way into eateries of all sizes and — praise Escoffier — price points.

White linens are great, but mid-range restaurants, gastropubs, and shops taking things to the next level for the masses are changing the local dining scene by leaps and bounds. Those businesses, and the people behind them, are who I'm celebrating this go-round. — *Brandon Hernández*

# I'm just an average guy who likes to eat, cook, and travel. Food is the window through which I see the world.

It's through various cuisines that I learn about history and culture. It's the same with travel; a wonderful cebiche with a bracing leche de tigre (tiger's milk) inspired us to visit Peru. Nam khao, a symphony of textures and flavors, had us crossing the Mekong and into beautiful Laos; tasty mezeler and lahmacun led us to Turkey. I'll go as far to say that meeting and marrying my wife was inevitable. She is originally from China, where one of the usual greetings (in Chinese) is, "Have you eaten?"

I was overjoyed when my office was moved to the Kearny Mesa area two years ago. It's where we did the majority of our shopping and eating. Having access to the fruits of Convoy Street at lunchtime is a work benefit almost equivalent to having my own private parking space. Here's a listing of my Kearny Mesa lunch rotation. — Kirk K.

The unfortunate reality of working behind a desk with deadlines, meetings, and whatnot is that many meals are eaten at our desks. When that is the case, the usual onthe-move lunch would be a bento from one of the three Japanese markets in the area, or from

the Korean Zion market. Being of Japanese ancestry and growing up in Hawaii, bentos — basically a box lunch — is a way of life for me. The composition of the bento is pretty basic: a starch, usually rice, along with okazu, loosely translated to be something to be eaten with rice. The best variety and most friendly and fastest (i.e., check-out) is Nijiya Market, which is my favorite. Marukai has a smaller selection, but is the most

inexpensive. Marukai is a membership market, but vou don't need a membership to purchase bento. For a change of pace, I'll grab Daeji Bulgogi (spicy pork) or the chicken version at Zion, though you'll have to work with the terrible parking and long lines at the cashier. Hopefully, this will soon be a thing of the past, as Zion is moving to the huge spot on the corner of Clairemont Mesa and Convoy. Mitsuwa has a variety that's just a level

below Nijiya and a rather large food-court area to eat in. For some reason, I find the cashiers in Mitsuwa to be the least friendly, sometimes even surly.



When someone mentions "food court" here in the States, it usually invokes visions of generic mall food. I call this samechicken-different-sauce syndrome. The food court in Mitsuwa Marketplace, though it consists of only two shops, is an exception. Kayaba is a rice bowl and tonkatsu shop. I stick to the tonkatsu, a pork cutlet coated with panko and deep-fried, served with an addictive mashed-potato salad with onions cleverly mixed into it. The pork is served on a metal spring contraption to make sure all the oil is drained off. I also enjoy the *katsu* curry, Japanese curry with a pork cutlet. Even though it seems like a shop serving ramen is opening up every couple months, I still enjoy Santouka's tonkotsu (simmered pork bone broth) and toothsome noodles the most. The *shio* (salt)

ramen *toroniku* style, with the fatty braised pork cheek and fixins on the side. Trips here fulfill the usual 10-30-10 criteria for lunch; a 10-minute drive, 30 minutes to order and eat, and a 10-minute drive back to the office, with a 10-minute buffer for the hour.

# Cali Baguette Express

If I want something lighter with a fast turnaround, a banh mi will usually do the trick. I'll usually grab one from the Convoy location of Cali Banh Mi Express. The company bakes their own bread, and you can get a banh mi for three bucks. I usually go with the Dac Biet, which has cha lua, defatted pork sau-

sage (think bologna, ham,

and pâté). The sandwiches

usual cilantro, cucumber, and pickled vegetables, including jalapeños, so if you're sensitive to heat, have them deleted from your sandwich or proceed with caution. If I'm in the mood, I love a Banh Mi Trung, basically a friedegg sandwich. It's comfort food for me, even with the pickled veggies, cilantro, and peppers. These aren't super-stuffed sandwiches here; it's all about proportion, and I find this one right for me. I've even picked up a baguette, French pâté, and spread on the way back to the office. Friendly staff and a usual quick turnaround make it a pleasant experience.

I avoid the chicken, beef, and noodle soup and go with either the shrimp fried rice or shrimp chow fun with XO Sauce, that pungent but tasty concoction based on dried seafood, garlic, and chilies. When the chef is on, you'll even get a bit of wok hei, the wonderful flavor a wellseasoned wok will impart to food when used skillfully over high heat. XO sauce is pretty pungent, so it's better to eat it during the lunch hour. The tangy shrimp tomato sauce rice is also a favorite, an almost radioactive red in color from ketchup — yes, ketchup, which, by the way, the Chinese claim was created in the city of Xiamen. Either way, it

### **Golden City** Restaurant

taurant that's not Sichuan. There is a huge multipage lunch-special menu during the week. Beyond all the Americanized Chinese food, I've found several dishes I enjoy. The Kwai Fei Chicken is on my desert-island-dish list. We called it "cold ginger chicken" in Hawaii. It's a seasoned steamed chicken served with an addictive ginger-based paste, almost like a pesto, that I love. On the lunch-special menu you'll also find a good variety of dishes and even items like steamed pork with preserved vegetable (psst, it's pork belly), fish fillet with black-bean sauce, pork chitlins with mustard greens, and roast duck, all priced under ten

bucks. The lunch menu is huge, with over 75 items, and is served between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. daily.

I enjoy two dishes served at Koon Thai. I usually avoid the ubiquitous "pick the protein, pick the sauce" approach and go for specialties. Once I found out that the chef is from Issan, izakayasakuramenu.com

the northeast region of Thailand, which borders Laos, I ordered the Nam Khao Tod, a crispy ricesour sausage dish. Here it's wet, almost like a larb, a bit different from the Lao version I love. Still, I find the flavor of the galangal and lime, along with the heat, refreshes me. The other dish that I enjoy at Koon takes me back to Thailand, the sweet-soy flavor of the Khao Karr Moo is a staple of food courts all over the "Land of Smiles." As if having simmered pork leg and rice isn't enough, there's always half a boiled egg as well. The portion size of the dish isn't overwhelming, and I'm usually happily on my way in about 30 minutes.

### Yakyudori Ramen and Yakitori

4898 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-268-2888, yakyudori.hinotez.com Yakyudori doesn't serve Yakitori during lunch hours. They do have a pretty solid Shio or Shoyu Ramen, though. There are also "combos" offered during the week, which include a small ramen and one or two more items. My favorites are the Thursday combo of a small ramen with chicken karaage, Japanese-style fried chicken, though I'd gladly trade the shumai for a couple more pieces of karaage. I also like the BBQ pork bowl that comes with the Friday

combo. It's basically marinated chopped pork and sauce over rice, topped off with corn, scallions, and mayo, which I keep forgetting to tell them to 86. (Maybe I am a closet mayo lover?) If you get there at 11:30, you can be out in less than 30 minutes. Unless you get distracted by all that slurping.

### Izakaya Sakura

Every once in a while I'm able to meet the Missus for lunch. During these alltoo-rare occasions when I can get away, we'll usually visit Izakaya Sakura. Yes, the restaurant with no sign. The lunch menu features rice bowls, combinations, and a whopping bento, consisting of over eight items, of which there's a limited number available each day. My current favorite is the Ebi Kakiage, a tempura of sorts, where small shrimp and vegetables are combined to form a crunchy nest. This is served over udon or soba, with a broth that can be ordered hot or cold. I've been enjoying the cold version over the summer and the unseasonably hot fall. All the lunch combos come with miso soup and sometimes a salad, though the Ebi Kakiage lunch comes with an extra onigiri (rice ball). The hours can be kind of spotty; they'll sometimes open a bit late and, if busy, the service can be carried out at a careful cadence, if you know what I mean. So, plan on a leisurely lunch at Izakaya Sakura.

"Yeah, but there's awesome bacon inside the waffle," she argued. "And the fried leeks!" True, the fried leeks. Also, the maple-caramel reduction lent a fragrant sweetness to the whole.

Come on, now — it's a chain. So, yes, they've got their fried chicken under a warmer when you walk in, and, yes, that means it may not be at the peak of deliciousness. But when we visited, they didn't have any breasts made up, and they happily fried one for the Wife. The fluffy waffle, too, was made fresh to order. The crust was on the thicker side, and it carried most of the flavor. Finally, the price was right: a waffle with a breast or waffle with two pieces of dark meat will run you \$7.

### BEST BREAST Gingham

8384 La Mesa Boulevard, La Mesa, 619-797-1922, ginghameats.com. They don't even call it fried chicken on the menu: "Milk Butter Chicken, Green Beans, Brown Butter, \$17." But, oh, yes, it's fried, after soaking in the aforemen-

tioned milk long enough to keep even the white meat drippingly juicy. A half chicken (wing, breast, leg, and thigh) is jacketed in a peppery crust that gathers in the crevices and holds a cracker crunch against the tang of the brown-butter drizzle. The bird sits atop a lumpen bed of smashed potatoes; the beans sit on top of the bird; and the whole thing is crowned with a nest of crispy fried shallots. Solid execution, gussied up just enough to make it a restaurant dish.

### CRISPIEST **Crispy Fried** Chicken

Batter? Coating? Who needs 'em when you've got chicken that tastes just salty enough right through to the bone and bubbling hot oil? If you ever need to bring, say, 15 pieces of fried chicken home to a houseful of starving-yetdiscerning souls, and you're at all worried about things getting soggy along the way, let these folks put your mind at rest. It'll run you \$14.99 for a mixed selection (though the breasts can be shreddy

and on the dry side).

### CRUNCHIEST **BBQ Chicken**

That's BBQ as in, "Best of the Best Quality," not barbeque. Because, of course, it's deep-fried in olive oil, which seems to permeate the meat, rendering it fragrant and unctuous (if dry on the breast). Here, however, the meat is the bedrock below the fissured, folded, and layered landscape of uniformly crunchy crust. So crunchy, it shatters when chewed; so crunchy, it endures the twin trials of travel and refrigeration. Yessir, it's crunchy (five pieces, \$9.45). And the jumbo-sized doublecrunch chicken wings (ten pieces, \$9.95) are indeed very nearly doubly crunchy (also spicy). ■



Even if it weren't my job to go out and look for new places to eat, I still wouldn't be able to eat the same thing over and over again.

I rarely visit any place on the regular. It's just not in my nature, as I'm always looking for something new. The following list includes a few of the spots I just can't stay away from as well as a few restaurants everybody should try at least once. None of them are fancy — most are the opposite — but they've all delivered a memorable meal or two. — *Ian Pike* 

### **Big Front Door**

I dig this combination deli and wine shop in University Heights as a place to grab a sandwich or salad and a special soda for lunch. The remodel that Steve "Sheep" Riley and company put the place through was just short of a miracle for the formerly dingy space. Now, the titular door swings open wide, and it's like a giant patio inside; great for sitting, and the staff will let you on the WiFi if you ask. The small selection of wine for sale (take-home only) has some cool choices, too.

### **Kiko's Place**

4404 Texas Street, 619-341-7397 Kiko's got its start in Baja in the '80s, and the Kiko's truck in the Texas Food and Liquor parking lot in University Heights sells the same Mexican mariscos for short money. The marlin tacos are outstanding and the aguachiles, clamatos, and seafood cocktails all deliver pure seafood joy. Buy drinks in the liquor store first (the truck has none for sale) and don't try to go on Sundays (10-7 any other

day). Bringing cash is a good idea, but if you want to risk it, they have Square running sometimes to take cards.

### Izakaya Masa

A lot of people ask me, "Where should I eat?" Izakaya Masa is my number-one recommendation. The compact sake house in Mission Hills has more charm and poise than half of uptown's restaurants put together. Best of all, the

kitchen's open until 1:00 a.m. in the tradition of Japanese *izakaya*. The exceptional tonkotsu ramen isn't available until after 9:00 p.m., but it crushes the competition like Godzilla on a bad day. Japanese tapas and sushi make up the rest of the menu, but I just can't say no to sake and ramen. Make reservations — it's small.

### **Que Huong**

4134 University Avenue, 619-281-6008 The only thing that's

not on the menu at this Vietnamese spot in a City Heights strip mall is vegetarian food. Everything else that flies, runs, or swims gets cooked up sooner or later. You want crocodile? They got that. Little, bony fish that're so hard to eat, the waiter shakes his head and warns you to pick something else? They got that, too. You can cook and wrap your own spring rolls working through a forest of fresh herbs and greens in the process — or just

Past the intoxicatingly meaty car*niceria* (stop there later) and a few seedy-looking bars. The oyster house will be on the left. Seven Seas Soup is the specialty of the house, but oysters and cockles are under \$10/dozen. Shrimp cocktail costs about the same. Go crazy with "La Negra Salsa Marisquera," a soyand-chili sauce.

### Blind Lady Ale House

The beer selection is neither the biggest nor the weirdest, but the tap list is composed with a care and finesse that no other place in town matches. I have it on good authority that company policy calls for rigorous flushing and cleaning of beer lines when kegs are changed out; a practice that's not as common as many people surmise. For every tasty brew at Blind Lady, there's an equally well-executed food offering. It's the best place to go to for moules frites (mussels and french fries) and cured meats.

# Coffee and Tea Collective

Sure, there's a solid dose
of *Portlandia* hipster

The guys at the Collective are sourcing, roasting, and applying boiling water to coffee beans with a Captain Ahab–like single-minded intensity that some people might call crazy, but I call it admirable.

### **Cueva Bar**

Cueva has grown much in the past two years. The bar has stockpiled some good wines and beers, and the kitchen has pinpointed which flatbreads and tapas are working out. But the real gem at Cueva is the staff. Chef Oz still makes time to chat with tables. Jo and Cory at the bar, who apparently never stop working, are great at remembering faces and always friendly. I like small places, and Cueva feels as small as it gets.

### Lefty's Chicago Pizzeria

3448 30th Street, North Park, 619-295-1720, leftyspizza.com

Yeah, Lefty's pizza is a little wacky. It's practically upside down and three times thicker than pizza has any right to be (even if that is how they do it in Chicago). But it's totally good. The "stuffed" pizza that takes a full hour

to make is probably the only pizza rightly called "pie." I approve. Plus, everyone there is nice and they remember people's orders with surprising accuracy. "Best pizza" is a tough call, but best pizza place is a no-brainer.

### Señor Mango's

Just remember this phrase: cottage-cheese cup with mango, watermelon, salt, *muchas chiles*, and lime. You'll thank me. Now, go forth and experience the greatest fusion of Mexican and Gringo cuisine there is! Sorry, California burrito, you had your day in the sun.Time to let the juice bar shine.

### Shabu Shabu House

Fact: anywhere along Convoy Street in Kearny Mesa is going to be a pretty cool meal. Shabu shabu just has the advantage of being more fun to do. It's a Japanese style of cooking where diners get a boiling pot of broth and swish meats and vegetables through it in a selfcooking frenzy of scorching soup. Good times. The *shabu* shabu is fairly mild — just a basic miso broth — so if you're into a bigger meal, go with sukiyaki. It's just as fun, but the sweet, salty sauce is more filling. Beware the hot drops! ■

Vokab Kompany jumped onboard the MTS jingle train.

Vokab was one of five local artists asked to record a 60-second spot for "Movin' and Groovin," a TV and radio ad campaign that will run locally for about a year.

The ads are created

trolley (MTS has 90 million trips a year) and to show the public that the taxpayer money that funds 55 percent of MTS operations is money well spent. Schupp says he turned to 91X DJ Mike Halloran for

a list of local artists. "Mike is so engaged in the local music scene, he is like an agency unto himself," says Schupp. The selected artists all met for pizza one night.

"We put specific themes, like 'Ride the Trolley' and 'How to Ride the Bus,' in a hat and each band selected their theme." Each band wrote their own lyrics and music.

The Kneehighs got "Tap & Ride — Compass Card": "North, south, east, and west/ MTS got you covered like your daddy's sweater vest."

Schupp says MTS paid "a nominal fee" to Big Fish studios in Olivenhain to record all the spots. He says a separate company will create animation to go with each jingle for the TV ads. "We gave each band the premise, and they did all the creative," but, he says, some of the lyrics were too complex and needed to be simplified.

Cutting commercials has been particularly good to Ron Fountenberry, who has performed locally as the Incredible Moses Leroy and in the Softlightes. "I kind of stopped doing the band thing." Fountenberry says he didn't get residuals or royalties when he cut spots for Ford, Vicks, American Express, and UCSD Health Systems. "I just got paid one upfront fee." He won't discuss figures. "Let's just say I can't complain. I sure get more [from commercials] than I ever got from being in a band. This is the new frontier, since

radio isn't playing much new music anymore."

Busted Drums. "I'll probably piss a lot of people off, but I'm willing to put it on the line to get things fixed." Bill Ray (aka Bill Ray Drums) of Ocean Beach has problems with the condition of the electronic drum kit in the V Lounge at Viejas Casino in Alpine. "I'm not asking for anything other than the drums be maintained." He claims the equipment has been pounded into submission over years of use and abuse.

"You hit the cymbal pad and nothing happens. It doesn't ring. It just goes thunk and nobody hears it. There's not a thing you can do about it," he says. "It takes the joy out of playing music."

He explains that the internal electronic triggers work intermittently at best. "Those drums are being played by several bands all day long. They weren't pro quality to begin with." Because of that, he says, "you're not getting a proper representation of the band. You're getting only what they pipe out to the audience."

The bad drums have taken a toll on his performance. "I was having a meltdown the other day because I was trying to play a gig on this equipment. I'm passionate about what I do." He says he'd just as soon truck his analog kit into the V Lounge and use that,

but drummers are mandated to use Viejas' electronic kit without exception.

"I approached the stage manager at Viejas about fixing

drums, says Ray. "Nobody in San Diego is stepping up and doing anything about it. Everybody is afraid of making waves and losing their gig." Then,

the drums. I left him a phone message and an email," he says. "I never heard back."

"We actually have two complete electronic drum kits for that venue in the casino, the V Lounge," says Bob Scheid, a spokesman for Viejas. "And we keep them in good repair. I just checked with the sound tech." I ask if Bill Ray has any support in his drum dissatisfaction. "We've had no complaints from other drummers that I'm aware of."

Bill Ray was one of Ike Turner's Kings of Rhythm and has appeared on, by his own count, more than 150 albums as a session drummer. His history with Viejas goes back to 1993. That was the year he fell through the stage floor in the Dreamcatcher room.

The problem in Viejas' V Lounge is larger than busted

almost as an afterthought, he says this: "If they want to blackball me, then that's their prerogative." For Bill Ray, the ultimate solution is to move on. "I've canceled any gigs at the V Lounge and handed them to other players who can handle the casino's gear."

Since then, he's been cooking up a new batch of comedic cuts, including "Check Into Cash," "Friend Zone," "Deezeriffic," "Hairy Palms," and "Self Deprecating Love Song," which includes this memorable verse: "I'm about to renew my subscription to Maxim/ and read all about the female orgasm/ If there's three in a threesome, and two in a twosome/ I guess that must mean that I'm handsome."

"As long as there are people who want to laugh, I'll have an audience to play for," says Deez, whose day job as a medical assistant at Mercy Hospital ("I deal with cannulated bile ducts and remove gallstones") affords very few chuckles. "Making people smile is one of my favorite things to do, on and off stage. It's a euphoric feeling for me. It's a high. I can't get enough of it."





This is the age of the rock-star DJ. Where once anonymous technicians lurked behind turntables and electronics, now there are household names (more or less) with trademarked haircuts and masks. These guys (and they are all guys, aren't they? Why is that?) play all the big music festivals, pack huge halls

on their own tours, and occasionally appear on

the covers of national magazines. So, if Skrillex is a rock star of electronic dance music. Dan Deacon is the indie-rock version - he's beloved by a small but committed and knowledgeable audience, and his music is perhaps less fun but arguably a lot more interesting.

Deacon first gained national and international recognition five years ago with the release of Spiderman of the Rings, a record full of breakbeats, electronic drones, and weirdly distorted vocals. The goofy videos and celebratory concerts that followed gave him a reputation for party music. But Deacon went to grad school for music composition and has continued to compose music in a more classical vein. His records didn't stay goofy for long. This year's

America is his most serious yet, anchored by a half-hour-long, four-part suite called "USA,"

Inspired by both his travels and by the Occupy movement, Deacon has grown increasingly outspoken politically. Still, his habit of distorting vocals makes it hard to tell if any of that has showed up in the music. "USA." which could be his grand statement, mostly does without vocals. At some points, it also does without electronics or beats. So there you



have it: Deacon is the rock star of electronic dance music who's not rock, not quite a star, and not always electronic or danceable. That's just about perfect.







"I was reading Stephen King and a lot of that kind of stuff at the time, and I wrote a bunch of fiction songs," Vaden Todd Lewis once told me about a song he wrote called "Possum Kingdom." "It's kind of a go-to way to write for me, to find a good story and flesh it out." "Possum Kingdom." released in 1994. is still in alt-rock radio rotation across the country. It centers on Possum Kingdom Lake in Texas: "I'll not be a gentleman/ Behind the boathouse/ I'll show you my dark secret/ I'm not gonna lie," sung to the visual of a body bag being dragged from the lake's waters in the accompanying video. "What I like about music is that I can be very vague and make it be about what I want it to be about," says Lewis, "without having to be upfront about it."

The Toadies started in 1989 in Ft. Worth, Texas. It took them four years to release their first EP, Pleather, which brought the band to the attention of Interscope Records in 1993. They disbanded after seven years, following the release of their second album Hell Below, Stars Above. For a while, Vaden Todd Lewis performed with the Burden Brothers. But by 2007 the

Toadies, now minus bassist Lisa Umbarger, were back in business. At the time, I asked Lewis if he'd ever tried writing short stories, but alas, his answer was no. "I've never tried writing short stories, but I imagine that would involve being a little more direct," 2008's No Deliverance (Play.Rock.Music. was released this year) actually seemed more about real people and places. "Some of it was real," Lewis admits, "and some of it was based on, well,



my wife is a psychologist. So, I hear a lot of good stories. No names, but stories. Some of those songs are about some of those people." Helmet and UME also perform.



Ukulele-based covers might seem to bypass an essential element in the Replacements' mix of yearning with bravado — Paul Westerberg and Co. were rockers, albeit of a powerpop persuasion. But Nashville-based duo Bright-Little-Field's homespun approach (dual ukuleles, upclose vocals, and congas) sidesteps

the threat of uke cuteness and underscores Westerberg's songwriting while paying homage to his delivery, turning a questionable idea into a winning proposition. Replacements fansbut-not-fanatics, like myself, are motivated

myself, are motivated to dive into the Replacements' back catalog. And B-L-F plays with such spirit on *Treatment Bound* that I want to nose around about them, too.

Westerberg's strong melodies, generally romantic worldview, and casually concise exposition, such as "Let's count the rings around my eyes" ("I Will Dare") and "Somewhere there's a smile with my name on it" ("If Only You Were Lonely"), shine in this setting. Still, diehard rockers may be reassured: the Replacements could have blown this sucker away.





atthew Compton, bar manager at Thrusters Lounge, claims that the Basil Hendricks is a "perfect summer cocktail."

"It's not something," he says, "I could see someone drinking in the middle of winter in the middle of Wisconsin, to be honest."

Having concocted the cocktail in his kitchen, Compton says his creation brings together a few of his favorite ingredients - limoncello, lemon, and especially basil.

"I wanted something to pair basil with in a cocktail," he says. "So I started doing a little mad scientist cocktail hour in my kitchen."

The cocktail also challenged him to give up some old grudges, Compton says, against the juniper berry.

"I'm not a big fan of gin," he says, "so I wanted to make a gin drink I would enjoy."

While a perfect match for any summer day, the Basil Hendricks also has a special ingredient that lends itself well to cool autumn evenings (cool, at least, by San Diego standards) - a light dusting of spice that serves as the cocktail's finishing touch.

"You don't want too much clove," he says of the spice that invariably invokes the scent of burning leaves and visions of foliage sporting a more earthtoned wardrobe. "Too much will overpower the drink so that you'll taste nothing but the clove. It's literally a shake in your hand — one salt shake."

In season and out, though, Compton insists, the Basil Hendricks will not disappoint.

"The lemon in the drink calms the clove down to the point where you can taste how fresh and effervescent the gin is on the inside," he says



### **San Diego Asian Film Foundation becomes Pacific Arts Movement**

You can call it Pac-Arts or you can call it SDAFF, but "as a kind request," please do not refer to the newly dubbed Pacific Arts Movement as PAM.

"I never grew up thinking I was going to run a nonprofit organization," Pac-Arts executive director Lee Ann Kim laughingly admits, "so in the beginning I didn't really know what

I was doing." When the San Diego Film Foundation was born, she chose the name "completely without any kind of imagination. I'm a little bit smarter now....

"For the last 12 years we've been operating as the San Diego Asian Film Foundation (SDAFF^1)," Kim said, "and that was very confusing. Because the acronym and the words were so close to the San Diego Asian Film Festival (SDAFF^2) most people thought of us as just a film festival."

Nothing could be further from the truth. In addition to the annual festival, Pac-Arts presents its weeklong Spring Showcase, Reel Voices (a documentary filmmaking bootcamp for youth), DigiFest (a free online showcase of feature-length films), and Drive-By Cinema (a new experimental mobile cinema project).

"We're also more of a cultural and social movement than a festival," Kim continued. "When people hear Pacific Arts Movement, it doesn't peg us just as a film festival in San Diego. Since we're located on the Pacific Rim, it reflects our region and 'Pacific' feels less 'niche-y' than the word 'Asian.' Most people look at us as SDAFF^2 anyway, so it makes a lot of sense for us to change the name."

This year, SDAFF^2 runs November 1–9. You'll be hearing more from Matt and me about the festival lineup as screeners arrive. For a complete list of films or more information, visit

### A closer look at Brad Pitt's ad for Chanel No. 5

Astonishingly, folks are calling movie star Brad Pitt's ad for Chanel No. 5 "nonsensical." (Go ahead, Google it.) The problem is the dialogue, which seems to have been lifted from Terrence Malick's Significant Whispers (not its real title).

But we here at The Big Screen know that Mr. Pitt is nothing if not selective about the projects he chooses, and we think we may have figured this one out. Read with a certain squint, the script serves as a nod to Pitt's early film career — to the years before Angelina, before Jennifer, before Clooney and the self-aware movie-starness of the Ocean's films. The days when he was a sexy, cool actor, but not yet a cornerstone of the Institute for Sexy Coolness. Viz:

"It's not a journey. Every journey ends, but we go on." Easy reference to Pitt's breakthrough role in the doomed-roadtrip film Thelma &

"The world turns, and we turn with it." The line fairly drips with the timeless, ruminative character of A River Runs Through It.

"Plans disappear; dreams take over." Dreams? Plans? 12 Monkeys. A protagonist whose haunted dreams take over his plan to save the world by foiling a plot to unleash a supervirus.

"But wherever I go, there you are." Easy: Interview with the Vampire. Tom





Cruise's Lestat haunts Pitt's Louis down through the years. Every time Pitt thinks he's escaped...

"My luck." A tricky one. But I'm going to go with Seven, because of Pitt's extraordinary bad luck in becoming the object of crazy Kevin Spacey's envy, and because Seven was kind of a big-deal film...

"My fate." Easier than luck, since death is everybody's fate, and Pitt just happened to play Death in Meet Joe Black.

"My fortune." Hello, Snatch, which casts Pitt as a crook looking for a big

But my favorite bit is the last line: "Chanel No. 5. Inevitable." A brutal self-assessment from the man who played anti-consumer extraordinaire Tyler Durden in Fight Club.

Anyway, that's my take. Anyone got a better explanation? You know, besides the \$7 million payday?

**3,2,1... Frankie Go Boom** — Ron Perlman as a transsexual; plus a madcap dash to destroy all records of a sex tape depicting a failed coupling with Lizzy Caplan. For

**Alex Cross** — Tyler Perry sells out? Outsider auteur takes on a studio prequel, playing a detective-psychologist role that Morgan Freeman made famous back in 1997 with Kiss the Girls. Matthew Fox stars as the Crazy Sadist Guy who needs figuring out. 2012.

Argo — Oscar-bound dramatization of the far-fetched but true story of six Americans who managed to escape the Iran hostage crisis in 1979 and find shelter in Canada by pretending to be actors in a big budget Hollywood space opera. Ben Affleck directs and stars as the CIA "exfiltration" expert who comes up with the outlandish idea of hiring a once-big producer (don't laugh when you see the poster on Alan Arkin's wall) and makeup man (John Goodman) to give credence to the bogus project. The behindthe-scenes exposé of Uncle Sam-as-auteur accounts for half a great movie. Even if you are not familiar with the incident — the information was eventually declassified in 1997 — the ending is pretty much a foregone conclusion. Affleck needed a stylish touch of sleight of hand to sustain the suspense required to elevate the third act above a typical Bourne sequel. It also suffers a bit from the cutes, as evidenced by Alexandre Desplat's syrupy score and one "Argo 'f' yourself" too many. The cast helps to keep things moving — particularly the hilarious interplay between Arkin and Goodman. And is it me, or should Bryan Cranston be in every film released? Worth

seeing, but nowhere near the movie people are going to tell you it is. Make sure not to leave before to obligatory closing credit sequence where they show what the real victims looked like. They got the hair right! With Victor Garber, Clea DuVall, Rory Cochrane, and Zeljko Ivanek. 2012. - S.M.

**Back to the Future** — The task of tailoring the time-travel theme to the teenage market has led to, besides such concrete accessories as skateboards and electric guitars, an inordinate dwelling on anachronisms, with a contemporary teenager plunged (much like an addict of TV's Happy Days, only deeper) into the Fifties. It's as though the genealogical time-line has collapsed into itself like a retractable aerial, or better, has been bent back on itself in a U-shape, so that the generation gap may be measured as the distance between parallel lines and without any unflattering reference to age. The interest in anachronisms never, predictably enough, rises above the parlor-gamesterism into which the time-travel theme so frequently, and comfortably, settles. But at this frivolous, almost vaudeville level, with a very wide latitude for caricature, the movie is quite consistently amusing, and even when not, is too fast-moving ever to be really annoying. And the tremendous speed ought not to obscure how scrupulously director Robert Zemeckis has set up the time motif (starting with the Rube Goldberg array of alarm clocks during the credits), nor how thoroughly he has sketched in the small-town locale, soon to be jerked back through 30 years of undevelopment (or ought that to be de-development?). The plot that unfolds thereafter is a sort of juggling-act of hot potatoes, including such things as the hero playing Cupid to his own parents, playing hard-to-get to his own mother, and playing second-hand mentor to Chuck Berry. But the movie's brightest idea - its twice-baked potato as it were — does not come until the final fulfillment of the title. The weary timetraveller, having taken a hand in rewriting the future, now finds himself back in the present with a different past from everyone else. That idea, with its infinite possibilities for nostalgia and alienation, is passed over, of course, as rapidly and unreflectingly as every other idea in the movie, but coming as it does at the very end, or the virtual end, excepting one final frivolity, it tends to linger. ### Diana Vreeland: The Eye Has to

Travel — BioDoc on the famed Harper's Bazaar fashion editor. Best line from the trailer: "She made it okay for women to be outlandish and extraordinary." Just not, you know, fat. Close runner-up: "She dared to make everything beautiful." Just not, you know, fat people. Fashion! 2012.

**Dredd** — A tight, trim, grueling police drama about a homicide investigation that turns into a drug bust that turns into a nasty game of cop-hunt. It's the future, so naturally, things are urban, wasted, and awful. Overmatched officers in full body armor patrol a city that stretches along most of the northeastern seaboard. They can respond to only a fraction of reported crimes, so for efficiency's sake, they must also act as judges, juries, and executioners. There is very little here to complain about: no self-conscious silliness, no pointless effects (the occasional slo-mo is the result of a drug that slows down perception), and very little in the way of impossible acrobatics. The cliches (Olivia Thirlby as a pretty rookie, Lena Heady as a scarred villain) don't grate, the catchphrases make sense, and star Karl Urban manages to convey a character without ever removing the helmet that obscures the upper half of his face.

Frankenweenie — Director Tim Burton returns to a short film he made at the very beginning of his career. If the move signals a certain failure to advance creatively, it also marks a return to the realm of the heartfelt, which is where he does his best work. So yes, you'll see a lot of familiar Burton elements: black and white (Ed Wood), a mad scientist in the midst of cookiecutter surburbia (Edward Scissorhands), life-after-death (Beetlejuice), and even a Johnny-Deppish mien for the protagonist, a boy named Victor Frankenstein. And ves. as his name suggests, the original short is based on someone else's idea. But even so. it's alive — inspired, even. We may wag our fingers at Dr. Frankenstein's mad quest to cheat death in Shelley's masterpiece, but who could condemn a heartbroken boy's desire to recover his beloved dog? Young Victor does science for love, and happily, old Burton is here doing movie-making for the same reason. (An exchange between Victor and his science teacher may even serve as a mea culpa for some of Burton's late-career missteps.) Of course, in stretching a short to feature length, Burton is forced to take an homage to one classic monster movie and turn it into an homage to a whole bunch of classic monster movies, with occasionally ungainly results. Still, he manages to keep a spirit of mildly creepy fun throughout, and he even comes within a tail's twitch of a magnificent ending. 2012. — M.L.

**High Noon** — The thinking man's Western by Carl Foreman, writer, and Fred Zinnemann, director, rounds up a basic unit of stereotypes — the legendary aging lawman, his pale-skinned pacifist wife, the dark-complexioned shady lady from his past, and a band of desperadoes with a score to settle — and nearly paralyzes them with repetitious and largely irrelevant antipopulist propaganda. It is a tribute to the genre, and to the sagging face and shoulders of Gary Cooper, that the stereotypes succeed in holding your interest in spite of all the belabored intellectualizing. An unduly protective vampire daddy (Sandler) who runs a restricted resort — the clientele is limited to "monsters only" — goes bat shit when he discovers that his teenage daughter (Selena Gomez) has fallen for a human (Andy Samberg). All of the background monsters appear to have been lifted from past sources; Sandler's "blah-blah" Bela Lugosi impersonation is as original as things get. As if 8 Crazy Nights wasn't proof enough, this further hammers home the fact that an anthropomorphic Adam is as annoying an impediment to entertainment as his liveaction counterpart. Russian TV animator Genndy Tartakovsky (The Powerpuff Girls, Star Wars: The Clone Wars) succumbs to the pressures of a mainstream PG release by refusing to explore any of the subtleties to be found in a relationship between an overprotective blood-sucker and a virginal daughter who he wants to remain intact. Then again, Sandler's craft is propelled by gaseous emissions, not nuanced wit. Fart jokes aficionados won't leave hungry. 2012. — S M

Plus, he tends to disappear for days at a time, a habit that distracts boy from his work as a documentary filmmaker, costs boy number two in his professional life in the publishing world, and does more than a little damage to their relationship. Lights drops in on the couple at various junctures over the course of a decade, and while the addiction/devotion story is nothing new, the film gets points for frankness in its depiction of gay lovers as real and occasionally horrible people. (Other frank depictions: gay sex and its occasional messiness, the power of drugs to overshadow a soul.) But that same commitment to verisimilitude costs it in the dramatic department: intimate it may be, compelling it is not. 2012. — M.L.

**Looper** — A nifty idea botched by writer, director Rian Johnson's (Brick) unnecessarily dense plotting. (A calculatedly confusing storyline does not a good movie make.) Tickets should come with a road map (or a comic book adaptation) wrapped around them to help guide audiences through this. In a dystopian universe that resembles any number of cramped, squalid depictions of a Hollywoodized future, the mob blindfolds finks and sends them 30 years into the past to be whacked by hitmen known as "loopers." There's a catch: when a hired gun displeases the boss and it comes time to "close the loop," the baddies are stuck in the wayback machine and sent on a suicidal blast to the past. But wouldn't it have been simpler to direct Joseph Gordon-Levitt to brush up on reruns of Moonlighting to help find his character, rather than saddling him with a distracting makeup job aimed at passing him off as a dead-ringer for a young Bruce Willis? It officially lost me when Willis and Levitt met for a Tarantino-style diner scene topped by a dumb-dumb "old man"/"boy"

exchange and a spray of bullets. Everything after that was an incomprehensible blur. With Emily Blunt, Piper Perabo, and Qing Xu. 2012. — S.M.

Marnie — Women's-magazine Freudian romantic drama about an icy hypertense blonde with an interesting collection of obsessions — kleptomania, sexual disgust, a tendency to black out (or red out, actually) at the sight of anything red. Hitchcock pilots the thing with a vulgar, comfort-craving delight in Quality Living — vast country estates, riding stables, the race track, an ocean cruiser, separate bedrooms, etc. With Tippi Hedren, Sean Connery, and Diane Baker. 1964. — D.S.

The Master — Happily, and despite the fact that director Paul Thomas Anderson used controversial Scientology founder L. Ron Hubbard as a model, The Master is more than a modernized re-hash of the religious chicanery at the heart of Anderson's There Will Be Blood. Rather, it is an exploration of broken humanity in need of repair, as represented by the deeply damaged WWII vet Freddie Quell. Played with dim, slurring ferocity by Joaquin Phoenix, Quell is a twisted man, from the scar on his lip and the hunch of his shoulders to his insatiable thirst and his rampant sexuality. (When we meet him, he is making moonshine on a beach before getting nastily intimate with a naked sand sculpture.) When he stumbles into the life of gregarious guru Lancaster Dodd (a blowsy, mustachioed Philip Seymour Hoffman), he is almost instantly converted — not because he's seen the light, but because Dodd peers interestedly into his darkest corners and does not look away. Instead, Dodd embraces the animalistic Ouell and seeks to bring him to spiritual enlightenment. Like Jesus Christ, the Master comes to cure the sick. (Unlike Jesus Christ, he also comes to solicit donations from the healthy.) What follows is a touch overlong and overindulgent, but still full of memorable images and formal excellences. And it's a credit to Anderson's skills as a filmmaker, rather than Dodd's skills as a healer, that the film finds its way to an ending that is both humane and satisfying.

**North by Northwest** — The topper of all of Hitchcock's cross-country cat-andmouse thrillers. The species that was spawned in the Thirties with Young and Innocent and The 39 Steps has undergone some body-building after all these years of exercise, and emerges here in a form higher (the United Nations building), wider (the Midwest corn fields), and grander (the face of Mt. Rushmore) than ever before. There are ample tipsy giggles and hokey excitements, thanks largely to Cary Grant's broadly played and easily ruffled dignity, and thanks very slightly to James Mason's prissy villainy. Eva Marie Saint, done over as if for Harper's Bazaar, steps surprisingly to the fore of Hitchcock's line of icy blondes, 1959. — D.S.

The Other Dream Team — When the Soviet Union won the gold medal in men's basketball at the 1988 Olympics, four of the five starters hailed from the same city. That city was not in Russia, but Lithuania, a country that had been under Soviet control since World War II. Lithuania had been a basketball hotbed long before the Soviets arrived in 1940, and their continued prowess became a form of resistance, a way to "bite the Red Bear in the ass." (When a former exile recalls how "basketball gave us dignity" while in Siberia, the meaning and importance that sports can assume becomes clear.) By the time of the '92 Olympics, Lithuania was a newly independent and deeply impoverished nation in desperate need of uplift. The Other Dream Team traces the history of those four Soviet starters-turned-Lithuanian stars, setting their stories against a very pertinent political backdrop. If the material gets stretched a little thin and the political machinations leading up to independence remain a little unclear, the overall effect is still bracing and welcome. 2012. - M.L.

**The Paperboy** — Taken for what it is — and that includes a final third that comes with its own unique set of loopy, non-linear terms — this followup from *Precious* writer-director Lee Daniels does just fine as a smutty sex-and-servitude potboiler that never bores. The 1969 murder of a small-town sheriff in Moat County, Florida sends investigative reporter Matthew McConaughey (who deserves a lifetime achievement award for this year's output

alone) back to his roots and onto the trail of what could turn out to be the scoop of a lifetime. He joins forces with his younger brother (Zac Efron), a "paperboy" for the mob, and a never-sexier (particularly if you go for the slutty, '60s, teased hair, lavered-on mascara, cigarette butt dangling from the corner of her mouth, Julie Christie type) Nicole Kidman to right the wrongful accusation of swamp psycho John Cusack. There are several obvious cheats in both the logic and narrative departments, and the film has a near-unhealthy fixation on Kidman's private parts. But if nothing else, it's a technical step forward for Daniels: the gimmicky flash cuts and mini-montages that marred Precious remain, but happily, there are fewer of them, and he occasionally finds a way to have them advance the story. 2012. — S.M.

### The Perks of Being a Wallflower

 Author Stephen Chbosky adapted and directed this version of his bestselling young adult novel about Charlie (Logan Lerman), an emotionally damaged high school freshman who is lucky enough to fall in with a couple of senior step-siblings: the fabulously gay Patrick (a barely restrained Ezra Miller) and the adorable Sam (a lovely but granitic Emma Watson). They introduce him to the glories of marijuana, mixtapes, and The Rocky Horror Picture Show, but also the nightmares of unrequited love, bad trips, and closeted sexuality. And along the way, he's got some baggage of his own to unpack. Mom and Dad are refreshingly human, but still sidelined — the adult pole star is English teacher Paul Rudd, who feeds Charlie a steady diet of Salinger, Lee, Kerouac, and Thoreau, and says things like, "We accept the love we think we deserve." The story lurches and bogs, and Miller sounds about 20 years ahead of his time (the story is set in 1991). But Perks is going for that teenage feeling more than anything else: of knowingness and wonder, of longing and fulfillment. Mostly, it gets it, thanks in part to a carefully chosen soundtrack. 2012. — M.L.

**Pitch Perfect** — The problem: geek culture has ascended to the point where it's difficult to portray, say, college guys who do *a capella* renditions of pop songs as lovable losers who have to triumph over their own peculiarity to win the respect of their peers.

Even if they're not the Big Men on Campus, who cares? They're the kings of their ecosystem, and after the death of mainstream pop culture, that's the best anyone can hope for. The solution: focus on college girls who sing a capella renditions of pop songs, but find themselves hampered by their inability to hit the bass notes that get a capella people excited. Then bring on the issues - body image, lesbianism, terminal shyness, domineering daddies, a tendency to vomit under pressure — and let the fun begin. At least, if you think relentless camp (sprinkled with sass and bitch-wit) is fun. But even if you don't, it's hard to resist star Anna Kendrick — she's game, so you are. And there's something Katharine Hepburn y about the way she manages to bring bring intelligence to farce. With Rebel Wilson, Skylar Astin. 2012. — M.L.

**Samsara** — Or, the world in 70mm. There are no words in Samsara, presumably to avoid distracting from the moving images onscreen and the way the camera moves to reveal them. And the lack of narrative gives the viewer a psychic space in which to bang up against the images. Watching sped-up sunlight move across an ancient statue's cracked stone face, I found it difficult to think of anything but the nowdead hands that had carved it. And that may be just as director Ron Fricke would have it - birth, life, death, and the cyclic nature of same are very much the point here. The loving depiction of our enduring creations (be they monuments, ceremonies, or simply spectacles) serves only to highlight our personal ephemerality. There is some trace of the sense that individual life and the way it is lived matters — Fricke lingers on images of African mothers with their children, and also African child soldiers toting assault rifles - but most often, his depictions of the mundane involve either ugliness (gluttonous eaters, desperate trash-pickers) or horror (the mechanized brutality of a slaughterhouse). A thinky film, but gorgeous enough to qualify as a sensual film, too. 2011. - M.L.

Happily, Farrell's life steps in to provide what imagination cannot, thanks in large part to his friend Billy (Sam Rockwell). See, together with his spiritually minded friend Hans (Christopher Walken), Billy kidnaps dogs and then returns them for the reward. Everyone handles their reams of delightful dialogue with aplomb, though Farrell isn't fooling anybody into thinking he's actually a failing, dissipated drunk. But forget about all this logic and aspect ratio mumbo-jumbo: here is what you really want to hear: Sinister delivers quality jolts. Talk about a gang that can't shoot straight: the inept baddies don't bother to frisk the chained Neeson to find a phone concealed in his sock. The laughably bad parental dialog exchanges — the retired CIA operative has been turned into a comical Papa Focker-type bent on warding off his daughter's potential suitors — appear to have been lifted from Father Knows Best reruns. Tai Chi Zero — Tired of movies that are either based on or feel like video games? Then how about a movie that actually incorporates multiple video-game motifs, from life-levels to motion indicators to pop-up data points? Not in the cutesy, selfconscious, Scott Pilgrim way, but naturally, as if such things were part and parcel of kung fu fighting. Lu Chan is the Freak, a prodigy whose very life depends on learning the internally based kung fu practiced in Chen village. The trouble is, they don't teach it to outsiders. Meanwhile, another outsider is seeking to bring modernity

to the village via a steampunk railroad machine. Toss in random animated sequences, cheek-by-jowl nu-metal and classical music on the soundtrack, occasional FPS POV, and helpful subtitle IDs for cast members ("1970s kung fu superstar Leung Siu-lung as Master Dong"), and you have something approaching the cinematic equivalent of watching TV while simultaneously listening to music, chatting online, and playing Xbox. 2012. — M.L.

**Trouble with the Curve** — There's trouble with the terminally cute script in this, Clint Eastwood's first actor-for-hire job since In the Line of Fire (1993). Clint stars as a corroded baseball scout with three months left on his contract. A severe case of macular degeneration forces him to make every day take-your-estranged-child-towork day. Clint's voice has long taken on the timbre of wind whistling through an empty beer can; as his seeing-eye daughter, Amy Adams acts as a formidable correlate to the throaty grouch. A love story between father and daughter isn't enough of a well-born target for fledgling screenwriter Randy Brown to aim at, hence the unnecessary romantic subplot between Adams and Justin Timberlake. You'll be feeling around in the dark for a scan button during the couple's two dance routines, but alas. And a dismissive third act flashback aimed at explaining away decades of bad blood is as formulaic as it is tasteless. Robert Lorenz, Clint's regular second-unit man, receives sole director's credit, but one glance at the film's formal design and thematic obsessions makes it clear who called the shots. Clint's display of friendship and loyalty is highly commendable. The same can't be said for the finished product. A solid supporting cast — John Goodman, Ed Lauter, Robert Patrick — is sent to the showers. 2012. — S.M.

### **LEAD STORIES**

- Researchers at the National University of Singapore described, in a recent issue of the journal Biology Letters, how a certain species of male tropical spider seemingly improves its chances of successful mating by castrating itself after releasing sperm. The scientists hypothesize that testes-removal makes the male nimbler and better able to trick and outflank competitor males that attempt to reinseminate the same females. Improving their strategic mobility also enables the male to avoid being killed by the female, which is yet another hazard in the spider-mating process.

### **Leading Economic Indicators**

- While top stars of World Wrestling Entertainment, such as John Cena and Triple H, earn upwards of several hundred thousand dollars a year in U.S. rings, pro wrestlers in Senegal can (in the wrestling variation called laamb) make almost that amount. In May, the undefeated national "champion," the "King of the Arena" Yekini, suffered his first defeat in 15 years at the hands of Balla Gaye 2, before a capacity crowd at Demba Diop Stadium in Dakar, earning the combatants a reported equivalent of \$300,000 each. (Per capita income in the U.S. is about \$40,000 and in Senegal, \$1,900.)

- In May, the Missoula (Mont.) Sheriff's Office was investigating the theft of a car from the victim's yard — a 1976 Ford Pinto (which, in addition to being a Pinto, had four flat tires).

- In Mesa, Ariz., in May, Manuel Ovalle, 35, was charged with burglary after allegedly breaking into a home and taking a Playstation 3 and two bags of water from the home's swimming pool. (Ovalle told police his own home had no water supply.)

### **Critters' World**

- Scientists from Lund University's Primate Research Station Furuvik in Sweden announced in May that they had evidence that chimpanzees are able to delay using weapons they encounter, hide them, and retrieve them later for use against "foes." The weapons were stones and chunks of concrete, and the foes were visitors to the zoo who annoyed the chimps. According to the researchers, the 33-year-old chimp Santino also took pains to hide the weapons in locations where they could be accessed easily for the element of surprise against the visitors.

- Bullfighting may be on the wane in some countries because of complaints about cruelty,

but in the village of Aproz, Switzerland, there is a replacement each May: cow-fighting contests. According to a Wall Street Journal dispatch, this is a serious business, especially for Alain Balet, whose cow Manathan has won the heavyweight title for three years running, and who "follow[s] training regimens worthy of professional athletes," including engaging masseuses. The action, however, is mostly head-butting (plus "abundant slobber," reported the Journal), and the "contest" is won when one of the cows loses interest and wanders away. Balet pointed out an obvious additional pleasure in raising championship cows: "It's still a cow. I can eat her."

### **Least Competent Criminals**

 On June 8, sheriff's deputies near Tampa, Fla., charged Robert Suggs, 36, and David Hall, 28, with taking a front-end loader and a dump truck from a construction site and using them to steal an ATM from a Bank of America drivethru. The theft took place at 5 a.m., and deputies arrested the pair that afternoon when they were found near the bank, still trying to get the ATM open.

On the same day, in Albuquerque, Thomas Molina, 38, was arrested in the act of fleeing a burglary at Central New Mexico Community

College. As he tried to climb out a window, his getaway was hampered by having gotten his foot caught in the blinds.

### **Redneck Chronicles**

— The Illinois Supreme Court affirmed a lower court ruling in June in which Marshall Hollins was sentenced to eight years in prison for taking cell-phone photographs of a 17-year-old girl with whom he was having sex. That sex was voluntary and, since Illinois' age of consent is 16, legal. However, the court ruled, it is still illegal in Illinois to take sexual pictures of a child, and that particular law defines underage as under 18. (Hollins had claimed, unsuccessfully, that he surely ought to be able to take pictures of a legal event.)

— Police in Decatur, Ala., were called to a home on South Locust Street in May on a report of a gunshot. They found that a 61-year-old man, who had been drinking beer to ease his toothache, had finally had enough and attempted to eliminate the tooth by shooting his jaw with a .25-caliber pistol. He was hospitalized.


