

Hiking trails for South Bay

Coastal Conservancy and county to fund \$1.98M Tijuana River Valley trail system Imperial Beach/San Ysidro — The California Coastal Conservancy is set to allocate up to \$1.5 million toward trail construction in the Tijuana River Valley Regional Park at a meeting scheduled to take place Thursday, February 14, drastically increasing the total

investment to date in developing a 22-mile trail system through the park for use by hikers, cyclists, and equestrians.

In 2003, the conservancy authorized a \$1 million grant to San Diego County to begin the process of developing the trails project, which included design costs and environmental studies throughout the 2000-acre park. Last year, the county received \$450,000 from the conservancy to build trails on the eastern portion of the land adjacent to Dairy Mart Road. The new money would go to fund six miles of official trails, in large part improving three existing "unofficial" pathways through the park that range from two to eight feet wide.

When completed, the trails system would allow travel from various starting points all the way to the coast and would connect with Border Field State Park, the California Coastal Trail, and the Bayshore Bikeway.

Construction on the new additions is expected to begin in September, with a targeted completion date of February 2016.

Congress demands answers for San Onofre

Representatives Boxer and Markey call for power-plant investigation

San Onofre — Democratic senator Barbara Boxer of California and Democratic representative Ed Markey of Massachusetts today (February 6) wrote the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission, urging it to investigate new information indicating that Southern California Edison and Mitsubishi Heavy Industries were aware of problems with the design of the San Onofre nuclear power plant's steam generators before they were installed.

Edison got permission from the California

Public Utilities Commission in 2005 to install four generators. Mitsubishi manufactured the new ones. But two new ones lasted less than a year and two others lasted less than two years. Boxer and Markey, both of whom head environmental committees in Congress, have been provided new information indicating that Edison and Mitsubishi "were aware of serious problems with the design of the San Onofre nuclear power plant's replacement steam generators before they were installed," they said in the letter to the

States the letter, "All people in our nation, including the 8.7 million people who live within 50 miles of the San Onofre plant, must have confidence in the [commission's] commitment to put safety before any other concern."

Man walks into sheriff's station after stabbing wife

Deputies discover body in pickup parked next to station

Imperial Beach — Just before 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 6, William Barker was driving home from work when several San Diego sheriff's cars fell in behind him, sirens blaring. Before he could pull over, the patrol cars stopped in front of the sheriff's Imperial Beach substation on Imperial Beach Boulevard.

"Not sure what's going on, but whatever it is, it's big," he reported.

A woman walking her children home from school saw firefighters and paramedics run from the fire station to the parking



lot between the substation and Imperial Beach City Hall. "They started doing CPR on a woman laying next to the white truck," she said, pointing to a white Nissan pickup truck parked just feet from the station's entrance.

Firefighters used a fire truck to block off Imperial Beach Boulevard at Ninth Street while deputies set flares to block traffic at Eighth. A San Diego sheriff's spokesperson told the media that, shortly before 4:00 p.m., a man walked into the substation and told deputies he had just killed his wife. Depu-

It stinks

an common sense and the legal system keep a bubble from inflating further? And maybe prevent a traumatic bursting?

San Diego could be the canary in the coal mine on these critical questions.

The subject is convention centers. All around the country, new centers

are being built and old ones expanded and refurbished, even though convention attendance has been dropping for years and centers are slashing prices and losing money. It's a classic bubble, but San Diego's power players want to build a half-billiondollar expansion on the existing center.

To do so, the City has concocted a convoluted trick play to evade the laws. City

voters have twice turned down an increase in the hotel tax (called the transient occupancy tax). Under the Constitution, state laws, and the city's own charter, voters must approve a tax increase. So, fearing a rebuke at the ballot box, the City seeks to unilaterally amend the laws by, in effect, calling the hotel tax an assessment. The city's hoteliers have supplanted the voters and approved the expansion and taxes to pay

for it. A lawsuit challenging that legal legerdemain goes to superior court late this month. In March, the Coastal Commission is tentatively slated to look at the

proposed project.

Heywood Sanders, professor of public administration at the University of Texas at San Antonio and the nation's reigning expert on convention centers, notes that between 2000 and 2011, convention center exhibit hall space ballooned by 35 percent while attendance fell 1.7 percent. Last year, space didn't increase that much, but "Cleveland and Nashville have new centers opening this year," he says.

San Francisco is expanding the Moscone Center, Los Angeles is planning new space tied to a possible football stadium, and Seattle is planning an expansion.

And all three are cutting rents, as is San Diego. In its 2012 annual report, the San Diego Convention Center Corporation admits that its market "is increasingly being targeted by other western regional convention destinations attempting to lure conventions away by

offering free or heavily discounted space and substantially lower hotel rates." So, San Diego is providing a rent subsidy, too — at the same time it wants to expand into a nationwide glut.

"Almost everybody is discounting and offering free rent," says Sanders. "Much of the rental incentive hits the bottom line on a center's operating loss." The center in Reno,

Nevada, is luring conventions with a huge bowling alley for convention-goers, called "the Taj Mahal of bowling." Las Vegas has its own — er, uh — conventioneer enticements, along with 4 million square feet of convention space, double the second highest, Orlando. The San Diego center admits that the seduction of Sin City "impacts our ability to compete."

Mission Bay turf wars

n one side of this bayside brawl stand cleat-wearing soccer and frisbee players; on the other, the City of San Diego.

During the past two months, park rangers have patrolled Mission Bay's parks handing out flyers to soccer and frisbee players, warning them against wearing cleats.

The crackdown on cleats is not some power trip from a policy-rabid ranger. The new directive comes straight from the city's Park and Recreation Department, prompted by complaints from a few individuals, referred to as control line fliers, who fly model airplanes. They say that the athletes' cleats tear up the turf.

On a sunny Saturday morning at 10:15 a.m., two dozen players of "Goaltimate Frisbee" — a game best described as hockey with a frisbee — gather at ski beach. They range from

lawyers in their early 30s to Goaltimate veterans in their mid-50s. They slide supports onto their ankles and buckle braces onto their legs as they wait for a group of soccer players to finish playing their weekly pick-up game at the park.

The two groups have met at Ski Beach, a 50-yard square of grass located near the boat ramp off of Ingraham Street, for over 20 years. The patch of Bermuda grass is convenient, never crowded, and offers a fairly decent view of the bay and Fiesta Island.

"This is one of the reasons we live in San Diego," says Don Pugh, who has been playing soccer at Ski Beach for more than 20 years. Pugh, a tall, sturdy 51-year-old native of New Zealand, continues to talk as he removes his shoes and knee brace. "We live here, in San Diego, so that we can play sports in the middle of January in shorts and a tee. We respect the rangers and this field. We've planted seed, removed rubbish after a holiday. We take care of this area for our own benefit and for the benefit of others. And we wear cleats for safety. All we ask is to continue doing as we've done for over 20 years."

The soccer players and frisbee players have it down to a science. The pickup soccer game begins at 8:30 a.m. They pick up their small orange cones demarking the field at 10 a.m. Then the Goaltimate frisbee players set

UNDER THE RADAR

Secretary of State's friend dis**barred** Wade Sanders, the

Navy veteran who served with U.S. Senator John Kerry during the Vietnam War and later played a prominent role in Kerry's failed presidential campaign, has finally been disbarred from the practice of law. When Sanders ran for Congress here in 2000, he enjoyed the financial support of prominent La Jolla Democrats, including the late Murray Galinson and C. Hugh Friedman, onetime counsel to

C. Arnholdt Smith and late husband of ex-congresswoman Lynn Schenk. Friedman died this January 29.

Back in May 2009, Sanders was given a 37-month prison term after copping a plea to charges of possessing child pornography. Once a top adviser to Lt. Gov. John Garamendi on veterans affairs and an assistant secretary of the Navy in the Clinton administration, Sanders was released from the pen last March, data posted on the federal prisoner locator website says.

According to the California Bar's website, the Sanders disbarment occurred January 9. A stipulation and "order of inactive enrollment" dated July 27 of last year says the conduct of Sanders "harmed sig-

In August 2011, when Sanders was still behind bars, Secretary of the Navy Ray **Mabus** stripped the former Swift Boat captain of his Silver Star. Kerry was recently confirmed by the Senate as president Barack Obama's new Secretary of State, succeeding Hillary Clinton.



Will dredging prevent future floods?

Court battles settled, crews to begin dredging Tijuana River Valley

On Monday, February 11, city crews are expected to begin dredging sediment and garbage from the drainage channel that originates at Smuggler's Gulch and runs north, into the heart of the Tijuana River Valley. The inundations often flood Monument Road, about a mile from the end of the city road.

The river channel at the Hollister Street bridge will also be dredged. The narrow and fragile old bridge traverses the river and is one of two key entry points into the valley. The area flooded in 2008 and 2010, trapping horses and livestock on the ranches located there. Before the 2008 flood was over, the San Diego Fire Department's Swift Water Rescue Team had rescued a half dozen people.

The dredging project comes after the city and lawyer Cory Briggs waged court battles over the permit process. Residents and ranchers pushed hard for the dredging.

"We're just grateful they're going ahead with it, and we hope they get it done before

we have any flooding," said John Gabaldon, president of the Tijuana River Valley Equestrian Association and a valley rancher.

Briggs had sued the city over how it issued itself a permit to dredge without what he calls "a properly done environmental review." Briggs said the superior court agreed there were problems with the permit and told the city to start over last fall. But all parties worked out an agreement in October to let the city dredge the two critical spots.

"The [Tijuana River Valley Equestrian Association] people who were there applauded," Briggs said. "And then the city did nothing for three and a half months."

The dredging has to be finished by February 15, when the light-footed clapper rail (a bird) mating season begins.

No rule-bending (this time), say city planners

Planning board denies variance request for three-story home on West Point Loma Boulevard

In a blow against the gentrification of Ocean Beach, architect Elizabeth Young's plans for a 400-foot variance on a planned three-story residence were shot down by the Ocean Beach Planning Board on February 6.

The home, in the 5000 block of West Point Loma Boulevard, is owned by the Douma family. The single-story house is a few doors down from the entryway to Dogs Beach and shares the block with two threestory homes, one of them nearly completed. The unanimous vote against granting the variance means the Doumas won't be building up anytime soon.

While some community members agreed with the board, at least ten neighbors showed up in support of the Doumas' request and to vouch for them on a personal basis. One neighbor suggested, in a somewhat joking manner, that the city should send a limousine to bring the Doumas to the meeting because of how much they care about O.B.

This would have been the third property

on West Point Loma Boulevard to have been granted a variance by the city, thus bypassing the O.B. Precise Plan, which the community put into place in 1975.

On Monday, February 4, a little cottage at 910 S. Coast Highway 101 in Encinitas was fenced off and partial demolition began. The single-story former residential building, probably built in the 1940s, had housed numerous businesses over the decades, most recently Azul Jewelry.

Construction workers on the site said

the building is being partially demolished and will be rebuilt in the same footprint as the old one. It will become the new location for a Christian Science Reading Room — a bookstore and library where folks can learn more about the Christian Science church.

Currently, the church's reading room is several blocks away, at 681 Second Street. But moving to Main Street may not help the church become mainstream: many Christian Science congregations around the country have an aging membership, and churches have needed to be consolidated or closed.




"No, that's terrible," I said. "That would be murder. I can't even believe you went there."

STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

Mattster:

In my '50s cruising days, after hitting Oscar's Drive In on El Cajon Boulevard, one stop we would always make was at a "magnetic hill" where steel cans appeared to roll uphill. I believe it was called Merlin Drive, but it might have been somewhere near the beach. Am I remembering this right?

— Sleepless in Spring Valley

"Magnetic hills," also called "gravity hills," are a worldwide phenomenon, and San Diego has had its fair share of mysti-

cal slopes over the years. I don't know if Merlin Drive (I assume you mean the road in Lemon Grove) ever had the reputation as a gravity hill, but it might have back in the '50s. Nowadays, the best gravity hill in San Diego is actually a free-

way off-ramp. If you exit 805 to Sorrento Valley and leave your car in neutral at the bottom of the ramp, you will roll back *up* the ramp while you wait for the light to change. It's creepy.

Folksy origins for gravity hills usually involve some paranormal activity. A popular backstory used for a lot of them is that, 50/60/70 or however many years ago, a school bus full of kids stalled out on the hill and the children all tried to push the bus. Something went tragically wrong and all of the rugrats died horrible deaths beneath the wheels of the bus. Forever after, the ghosts of the children reach out from beyond the grave and push unwitting drivers up the hill. Other popular explanations involve "gravitational anomalies" that somehow negate the attraction between physical bodies; and that's a quantum mechanical attraction, not a Tom Jones kind of attraction, for all you dirty birds out there.

Sadly, there are neither ghosts nor strange attractors at work behind the gravity hill phenomenon. It's just an optical illusion that makes the slope of the hill appear to run in the opposite direction. Usually, the miscue comes from a weird perspective on the horizon caused by a treeline, buildings, or something else that interferes with a normal frame of visual reference. It becomes impossible to determine what's "level" by visual cues alone. In the case of the Sorrento Valley off-ramp, the road actually turns upward just a little bit at the very end of the ramp; but because of the swooping, curving geometry of the freeway system, it's difficult to tell just by looking at it.

There's another freeway segment that seems to defy gravity, but it's not as well known to cars because nobody ever stops in the middle of the freeway to try rolling up a hill. The stretch of I-8 west between Descanso and the Willows

Road exit is open to bicycles and many a rider is familiar with the "hill" that can be climbed at 25 or 30 mph with relative ease. If it's not outright downward, it's at least flat.

Right now, Skynet could be massing its forces for the hostile takeover of civilization as we know it

Fortunately for all of us, the might of the Alice Research Institute rivals any evil organization. I've mobilized all available elf-power and gotten the facts. It turns out that one of your guesses was close. The building in question technically on Balboa Arms Drive just off Mt. Abernathy Avenue — is the property of AT&T Wireless. 



Welcome to one of the most exclusive (and expensive) stretches of real estate in San Diego: beachfront property in Del Mar.

This home, at 1936 Ocean Front, sits along the coast about a half mile south of the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club and has, according to its listing details, three bedrooms (plus a fourth optional bedroom), four full baths, and another two half-baths within the 4000-square-foot resi-

dence, built in 2002 on an 8250-square-foot lot.

"This incomparable architectural masterpiece is designed to be harmoniously integrated with its world class oceanfront location," describes the listing.

"Enter through a

beautiful courtyard featuring a lap pool complete with a bridge to one of the entrances to the home. The curved oceanfront façade and deck are reflective of the waves beyond. [The home has] breathtaking ocean views from all primary living and sleeping areas."

A "great room" looking out onto an oceanview terrace houses living and dining areas, and a stone bar opens to the chef's kitchen, complete with dual ovens, cooktop and professional-grade hood, and plenty of polished stainless steel.

From the main living area, one follows the glass-walled hallway looking out onto the entry courtyard back to the wood-paneled family room, featuring a unique fireplace, which has a full bath and could be used as another bedroom suite. Steps to the back lead to two guest rooms, each with a private bath and with one boasting a "full

1) Take Photo Walks.

A Photo Walk is just what it sounds like you go on a walk somewhere interesting and take photos of anything that looks amazing or interesting. The trick to a good Photo Walk is

to not set expectations too high. The point is to take a walk — first to see the world, and second to take pictures if anything comes along.

2) Open a magazine, see a beautiful picture of somewhere amazing, and then go there.

Last year I bought a *Life* magazine that showed

pictures of the 50 most beautiful places in the United States. I wanted to go to some of those places, so I did. I went to find beauty and capture it. The camera can make you an adventurer, an explorer of the world. I took this picture (above) in White Sands, New Mexico.

3) Do something uncomfortable. Push yourself to the edge of your limits.

I was in Page, Arizona, looking down at the iconic "Horse Shoe Bend," where the river makes almost a complete circle. Photographers die here each year when they get too close to the edge and slip off. I am massively afraid of heights, and this was a photo that I felt compelled to get. I was pushing myself to my limit — to test myself, but also to capture something that I found to be beautiful. The camera can give you a purpose to conquer the fear, but also a trophy and a story to tell others.

4) Tell a story with a picture to help someone in need.

It was Christmas. We were in Vietnam and we heard of an orphanage on the outskirts of town in a former prison. We arrived and saw the abysmal conditions, and when we opened the rusty gates to enter, we were greeted by the happy screams of beautiful but forgotten kids and babies inside. Each orphan had a single pair of clothes, and most slept right on the floor in rooms that used to be prison cells. We used the pictures to set up a Facebook page and tell the world the story.

5) Meet a stranger, learn their story.

He was well dressed while others were casual. He seemed to have a sense of purpose. I took a picture of him and he stopped to talk to me. He told me he was an English teacher many years ago, but not anymore. I learned that even though he had not had a teaching job in over 30 years, he awoke each morning, put on his work clothes, and walked outside,

> making his way to a job he did not have.

I later learned that, several years ago, his wife was hit and killed by a car while they went jogging at night. His life was empty, but he filled it with hope that things would get better. He thanked me over and over and over again for taking a picture of him

even though he never expected to get a copy of it. He was just happy that someone found him interesting enough to take a picture of him.

6) Make someone feel good with a picture you take.

A picture can make someone feel beautiful, or feel loved, or feel like they have a wonderful life.

7) Start a photography blog.

Starting my photography blog was a huge step in improving my photography. The blog was a personal way for me to put my pictures into a context with a story that would be interesting for others to read.

8) See the sun rise over the world.

The most beautiful light of the day for photographs is either sunrise or sunset. Since the sun is so low in the horizon it gives your pictures color, clarity and contrast that you can never get in the middle of the day.

9) Experience the seasons.

Living in San Diego, our seasons are subtle and most often seem like either spring or summer. Your camera can help you experience each season, helping you see and capture the beauty that each has to offer.

10) Do a 365-day project.

A 365-day project is only a commitment to try to take a single photo each day and post it. It will force you to practice every day and share every day. The best thing about a 365day project is you have a site that you can go back to for years which chronicles your daily journey though life.

Crime doesn't pay...well



known to be fixing soccer matches.

ontinuing with the soccer theme... Last week, Europol, the European Union's criminal-intelligence agency, held a press conference in the Hague to "announce the results of a Joint Investigation Team on match-fixing in football." This has some interest to the soccerhating portion of the planet (talking about us, people), since World Cup festivities in Rio are a little more than a year off and NFL fans will probably watch a few of those games.

Sitting behind what appear to be high school cafeteria tables pushed together, underneath giant letters hung on a wall spelling out "EUROPOL," are representatives from Europol, Finland, Germany, Hungary, Slovenia, Eurojust, and Interpol.

They are assembled to announce that after a 19-month probe — Operation VETO, to you investigators have uncovered 680 games that look as if they might have been fixed. More, the games include 150 international matches in South World (Asia, Africa, Latin America) and 380 games in Europe. Games include World Cup matches, European championships, Champions League games, semipro games, the whole deal. We are invited to give thanks for the splendid cooperation between enforcement agencies working together like brothers and sisters.

And then it starts to get a little weird. Panelists deflected questions about how many of the 680 games had already been reported in the press and how many were new. Panelists wouldn't name any of the teams or players involved in fixing games.

Quoting from a New York Times story, "Europol described a wide-ranging network of fixing that struck at the sport's core. Nearly \$11 million in profits and nearly \$3 million in bribes were discovered during the investigation, which uncovered match-fixing activity on a scale we have not seen before.... The scope of the investigation

covered games from roughly 2008 to 2011.

"This is a sad day for European football,' said Rob Wainwright, director of Europol. 'This is now an integrity issue for football.' Ralf Mutschke, Director of Security for world soccer's governing body FIFA, said sports bodies and prosecutors needed to work more closely together."

We can stop here for minute. If an international crime syndicate is fixing hundreds of soccer games (by far the most popular sport on the planet) and only pulls down \$3 million a year for themselves, then this must be the most incompetent crime syndicate known to man. If there was ever a reason to go legit, here it is. This crime syndicate needs to be in banking.

Former FIFA security director Chris Eaton believes the real number of fixed matches is around 6800, one hundred times higher than the figure given at the press conference.

As much as we all like a press conference featuring cops congratulating themselves on the job they've done, since the investigation ended in 2011, one wonders why these glad tidings have taken so long to reach us. No worries — those years were not wasted. Europol officials said 50 people have been arrested and another 425 people were under suspicion. If that doesn't cripple a top-notch crime syndicate, I'll eat my hat.

The civilian expert in all this is a Canadian journalist, Declan Hill. Hill earned a Ph.D. in Sociology out of Oxford, worked for the CBC (Canadian Broadcasting Corporation) as an investigative journalist, then as anchor of Newsworld International. He's made documentaries from the Philippines, Kosovo, Iraq, Bolivia, and Turkey, covering the Mafia, blood feuds, ethnic cleansing, honor killings...you get the picture. He also wrote the seminal book on soccer gambling, The Fix, published in April 2010.

Fixing soccer games and America's baseball steroids scandal share a common underpinning. In both cases, the information was known to the public for years, but the public didn't want to know, so nothing happened. According to authorities — and, more believably, according to Hill, the man behind soccer's crime syndicate is happy Singapore resident Dan Tan. He's happy because Singapore refuses to honor international arrest warrants made out in his name.

Here's Hill being interviewed by James Shaman, a sportscaster on the Score Television Network in Canada. Hill was asked to predict the 2014 World Cup winner.

He declined and then said, "Here's the unfortunate guarantee I can give you. One hundred percent there will be the same Asian match fixers that have gone to the Under 17s, the Under 20, the Women's World Cup, the Olympic soccer tournament, and World Cups for the past 20 years. I guarantee they will be there. I guarantee they will be approaching dozens of players on different teams. They'll be approaching the referees. Will those guys take their money? I don't know. I really hope they do not, but I know that they'll be there and I know that FIFA has done nothing effective to stop them from being there."

'G.K. Chesterton says, 'It is as healthy to enjoy sentiment as to enjoy jam,'" I announced to my husband Patrick as I spread some jam on my morning toast. "But clearly he wasn't speaking of this jam," I grimaced, after taking a bite of the Cascadian Farm Organics Apricot Fruit Spread, which had the texture of aloe vera (\$3.49 for 10 ounces at Sprouts).

"I feel one of your taste tests coming on," quipped Patrick.

A few days later, a group of us sat down for some tasting, including my dad.

"Gross. Too stiff and too sweet," grimaced pal Gus, tasting the Safeway Kitchens Apricot Preserves (\$2.79 for 18 ounces at Vons).

I agreed, adding, "It's dry and it comes across as marmalade."

Sprouts Apricot Preserves (\$3.99 for 17.5 ounces) tasted like gelatin, "and the fruit bits in it are grainy," added Patrick.

"I like the nice, round clumps of apricot in this Bonne Maman Apricot Preserves," I said, staring at the unstirred jar (\$5.79 for 13 ounces at Vons). "And it flows out of the jar, not just a blob of jelly."

The Serious Food...Silly Prices Organic Apricot Fruit Spread was a winner (\$2.99 for 10 ounces at Sprouts). "Apricot exploding in your mouth, tastes like mashed-up fruit," I remarked.

Trader Joe's Organic Reduced Sugar Apricot Preserves (\$3.29 for 15.2 ounces) was the third hit. "The fresh apricot flavor fills the whole mouth," I noticed.

Trader Joe's Fresh Apricots (\$3.49 for 17.5 ounces) rated lower than its organic brother. "I'm just getting sweet," noticed Patrick. The Knott's Berry Farm Pure Apricot Preserves suffered the same overly sweet dilemma (\$4.69 for 16 ounces at Vons).

"This Organics Apricot Preserves is too stiff for me," I said (\$3.49 for 11 ounces at Vons). "I want my jam to flow a little bit."

"But I do enjoy the fruit chunkiness to it," argued Patrick.

"This one tastes like pie filling," exclaimed Patrick, tasting a spoonful of Santa Cruz Organic Apricot Fruit Spread (\$3.99 for 9.5 ounces at Sprouts).

"And it has the color and sticky texture of caramel," I added.

The Safeway Select Apricot Preserves

"It reminds me of the jam my mom used to make from the apricot tree in our backyard."

(\$2.49 for 11.5 ounces at Vons) carried little fruit flavor, but the Albertsons Apricot Preserves (\$3.99 for 18 ounces) was a surprise keeper. "Strong apricot; you can almost feel the fuzz on the skin of the apricots," said Dad.

Randall Family Preserves Organic Apricot (\$2.99 for 10 ounces at Whole Foods) did not make the cut and was set aside with the group of nonwinners. "It's always de-

ceiving to me," I admitted, "when I see 'organic,' I assume it will also mean low sugar, but that certainly is not always the case."

"This one hails from Italy," sang Patrick, holding the jar of Capricci Del Bosco Apricot Jam (\$4.99 for 12.35 ounces at Whole Foods). "Ship it back to Italy," responded Dad, taking a lick. "I don't get apricot from it."

The jar of Tropical All Natural Apricot Preserves (\$4.99 for 18 ounces at Albertsons) had a heavy syrupy taste to it, and the Always Apricot Natural Fruit Spread (\$4.99 for 9.5 ounces at Whole Foods) was runny. "This is like a sauce I would put on a dessert," noted Patrick.

The St. Dalfour Thick Apricot carried a diluted apricot flavor and reminded Patrick of restaurant single-serving jams (\$3.99 for

10 ounces at Whole Foods). But the

Ralphs Apricot Preserves (\$3.29 for 18 ounces) made the keeper pile. "It has pleasant chunks of apricot in it, and it isn't too sweet," I offered.

Patrick raved about the Bionaturae Organic Apricot Fruit Spread (\$4.49 for 9 ounces at People's Organic Food Market).

"This is my favorite," he admitted, "chunks of fruit to chew on, and the apricot lingers with a delightful aftertaste."

The last three were all winners: Smucker's Low Sugar Apricot Preserves (\$4.89 for 15.5 ounces at Vons), Dickinson's Pure Patterson Apricot Preserves (\$5.49 for 10 ounces at Ralphs), and the locally made Jackie's Apricoty Jam (\$6.49 for 8 ounces at Whole Foods). "This Jackie's has a hint of ginger in it," noticed Patrick. "It reminds me of the jam my mom used to make from the apricot tree in our backyard."







Michael Binkow stands onstage in the event room at Valley View Casino wearing a headset, gray jeans, and a black zip-up jacket. A sevenpiece band stands quietly at stage right while Binkow instructs the audience of 200 or so to clap and cheer according to his directions.

"You guys are doing a great job not looking at the cameras," Binkow tells everyone.

He pauses to listen to the voice in his headphones. "You need a small clap?" he asks into the mouthpiece. He listens again, then turns his attention back to the audience.

"Okay, let's do a small laugh, like I told a joke," he says. "I'm going to tell this joke, and if you think it's funny, laugh. If you don't, pretend."

The woman next to me laughs as if this *is* the joke. But it's not. When Binkow does tell his joke, it's lame. But the audience laughs as if it's

hilarious.

When the fake laughter dies down, Binkow mumbles something about not being good at anything except producing and doing chores around the house, which causes more fake laughter.

Tonight's taping of local reality/ talent show 3 Minutes to Stardom will air a week from tomorrow, and the fake cheering Binkow generates now will help with the editing process.

His next instruction is for us to boo the judges.

"For example," he explains, "if someone you brought [here] sang, and you thought they were great, and the judges gave them, like, a five —

what would you do?"

The three local music dignitaries who serve as the show's judges aren't even in the room yet, but there is an eruption of loud, angry booing.

"No, not that big," Binkow shouts over the sound. "You wouldn't do it that much."

He changes tactics with barely a breath in between.

"Okay, if your birthday is before July, I want you to boo. If it isn't, don't. Okay, three, two..." He points to the audience to indicate that it's now booing time.

My birthday is not before July, and, therefore, I don't get to boo. Instead, I lean over and whisper to my friend

that this whole thing is absurd and bizarre. Inside, I'm secretly hoping that our seats directly behind the judges' table will get us lots of air time, and that a producer will notice the subtleties and nuances of my fake cheering and booing and offer me a guest spot on Law ಳ Order, or (at the very least) the chance to sit in another studio audience.



a background as a Disneyprincess dancer (yes, actually) went on a tour of red carpets and talk shows. She soon landed again in the thick of what she calls "the *Bachelor* franchise."





didn't stay quite as long as mega-restaurateur Brian Malarkey, who made it all the way to the 14th elimination on season three. But my soft spot for tater tots and big, effeminate teddy-bear men takes me to R-Gang Eatery in Hillcrest, where Sweeney reigns.

We sit at a table for two, surrounded by brightly colored pop art, drinking water (me) and ginger beer (him), while he gives me the scoop. Pat Benatar croons "We Belong" from the overhead speakers.

The story begins with Sweeney trying out for *Top Chef* three seasons in a row before he got called back. Each time, he wore the same T-shirt.

"It's an 'I ♥ Hot Moms' T-shirt, which was always meant to be a conversation piece. Inevitably, someone asks, 'What is it you love about hot moms?' And I say it's because they're usually married to hot dads, but I can't find a boy-cut T-shirt like that. So it just kind of became this schtick."

Sweeney speaks with exaggerated and somewhat ladylike gesticulations that add an unexpected dimension to his well-trimmed beard and bearlike body.

Eventually, the Hot Moms T-shirt did get him noticed. But not before Sweeney had worked his way up from recent culinary-school graduate to executive sous chef at the hip, downtown San Diego restaurant, Confidential.

Even after he received a callback following his interview for season five, the casting process included months of random, cryptic phone calls (which always ended with Sweeney still uncertain about whether or not he'd been cast), and a meeting with a psychologist.

"They want to make sure you're just crazy enough for reality TV, but not so crazy you're going to stab someone," he says.

A couple of weeks after the meeting with the psychologist, he received an email with a confirmation number and a set of instructions: plan to be away from work for five or six weeks; pack for warm, humid weather; capture the first time you meet each other. Everything has to be done on film." He pauses to sip from the squat, brown bottle of ginger beer, then adds, "And it's the most asinine thing in the entire world."

When the van arrived at the hotel, an associate producer accompanied each of the contestants to the front desk for his/

In July 2008, Sweeney flew to New York, where his season would be filmed. A man was waiting for him at baggage claim with Sweeney's name on a sign. The man wore an earpiece, and he turned out to be one of the associate producers of the show. Sweeney collected his bags and the producer told him that, once they got out to the van, Sweeney would be allowed to talk only to the driver and himself.

"So, we get in the van, and Jamie Lauren [another contestant] was there already," Sweeney says now, almost breathlessly, reliving the adventure. "I mean, your natural reaction is to introduce yourself, and we were both like..."

He stops and mimics an awkward, silent wave.







giant Ziploc baggy. You don't get that back until they put you on an airplane to leave."

The following morning at 6:00, Sweeney and the other 16 "cheftestants" met producers in the hotel lobby for bagels, coffee, and juice. There, they were instructed that this was a "TV timeout," during which no talking was allowed, and which would last through the van ride to their first shooting location.

In episode one, Sweeney first showed up on camera at his introductory interview, during which he said, "The inner queen inside me is screaming to know, 'Where is Padma

[Lakshmi, the show's host], and what is she wearing?"

His next appearance was during the season's first Quickfire challenge, which resulted in him slicing his thumb open as contestants raced to peel 15 apples each, using a knife instead of a peeler.

Sweeney's run on the show lasted through episode three. Though he did get air time in the kitchen, more often the cameras caught him prancing around during off-time, or spouting spicy one-liners during his one-on-one interviews.

"Me and my little lesbian gotta go up against each other, which sucks," he said of Jamie Lauren, when they went head-tohead in the first elimination competition.

"I think Tom's really cute. He's got great eyes. He's a cutie," Sweeney said of one of the judges in a voice-over while the camera showed him nervously presenting his dish of lamb sliders and orzofeta pasta salad. "I'd buy him a drink if I saw him in a bar. Hell, I'd buy him three."

In episode three, the group split into two teams and made competing Thanksgiving dinners for the Foo Fighters. Sweeney was eliminated for an attempt at banana s'mores topped with vanilla cream

and chocolate ganache. One judge called it a "failed concept"; another said it looked "like spit on the plate."

"I legitimately did not think I even had a chance for going home," he tells me. "I thought, There's three of us on the bottom. These two royally messed up, and I had one bad thing. I thought, I'm not going to go home when they have so many more fuck-ups."

During the exit interview, the producers reminded Sweeney that he'd said he was sure he wouldn't be going home. They asked how he felt now.

"It's, like, 'If I had the chance, I'd go back and throw everybody under the bus, and back it up and go over them one more time, if it means I'm going to save my own hide.' I was trying to be the cuddly bear, not the bitchy bear. If I knew then what I know now, I would have been calling everybody out on everything they did."

He laughs and then adds with a flamboyant lisp and a wag of his finger, "And your hair looks stupid!"

At this point in his

story, Sweeney's phone beeps on the table. He pauses to look at it.

"Sorry, one of my kids just texted me about what time they're in today," he says.

Kid, as in staff member. Another Pat Benatar song plays: "Heartbreaker."

"I'm not going to say it was a traumatic experience," he continues, "but if I had known then that there was going to be footage of me crying my eyes out on national television..." He sips from his ginger beer.

"Then what?" I ask.

He admits that being "that *Top Chef* guy" has advantages, especially as a drawing force for press and people seeking out restaurants owned and/or run by former contestants.



a restaurant, but when you have only three chefs from San Diego who have been on *Top Chef*, then you can say that a *Top Chef* contestant is opening up their own restaurant. And it's, like, 'Now we want to talk about it.' I definitely used that to my advantage as much as I could."

So, is Chef Sweeney eager to do another reality show?

"I am, but I'm not. I'm not, because I love my daily life, and to do anything that's going to throw you completely away from everybody for a month, at least, isn't something I'm necessarily eager to do. But at the same time, as crazy as it was, it was a lot of fun. I made so many great friends and contacts. On top of that, I didn't win *Top Chef*, so I still feel like I have some-

thing to prove."

Get to work

Along with the realityshow veterans in our midst, San Diego has also been the location for more than a handful of reality shows. The Real World (an MTV production featuring young, libido-heavy strangers living together) is likely the best known, PB Reality Show (produced by the Hugh Hefner-inspired self-proclaimed "PB Millionaire") is the most creepy and narcissistic, and Sand Blasters (which offers exploding sand sculptures and a \$15,000 prize) is the most bizarre.

Then there's *Get to Work*, the eight-episode series the *Huffington Post* says "convinces us that pointing a camera in someone's face 24/7 is actually worthwhile."

ager Rob Smith tells me. "At any given time, there would be four to five cameras going, eight hours a day. They did that for four months straight."

We're sitting in the

building's lobby. Smith has given me a tour of what he estimates is 20,000 square feet of offices, conference rooms, computer labs, and two huge walk-in closets filled to bursting with work-appropriate clothes donated by local businesses and individuals.

"You can watch [the show] and get an idea of the feeling," Smith says. "You can make all kinds of assumptions, but you come in on Friday, and you're going to see that the cameras become like furniture. These people are worried about, Where is my next meal coming from? Where am I going to sleep tonight? So, the camera is pretty much irrelevant."

Smith's voice is gravelly, and his accent reveals his New York roots. A stocky five-foot-five or -six, the 42-year-old has a strong handshake and a nononsense presence, even in casual conversation. It will be at least an hour into our meeting before he cracks his first smile. From the footage of *Get to Work*, my impression is that this demeanor is a requirement of his job.

Although not every Second Chance client comes via parole or probation, Smith estimates that 85 percent are convicted felons. In episode one, Smith tells the camera, "[Our students] know how to walk on a prison yard, but to walk into a job and be professional, that's a new arena for them."





Improving Men's Health And Perfomance ten seconds late are made to stand against the wall in the back of the room. One at a time, they are required to pay a fine or give up something of value in order to get their seats back.

One participant gives Smith three dollars. Another gives up his hat. One gives up his class ring. And one offers Smith some trail mix.

"I don't want trail mix," Smith tells him while the whole class watches. He looks the guy up and down. "I like those shoes."

The guy refuses to give up his shoes. He offers the excuse that he's not wearing socks.

Smith, who carries a stick of some kind, uses it to lift the guy's pantleg off the top of his shoe, revealing that he *is* wearing socks.

"No, high socks, I

meant," the participant says.

Smith sends him packing.

"Fuck you, you little fuckin' short bitch," the participant says over his shoulder as he walks out of the classroom.

Smith seems unfazed. He tells the camera, "You lie to me in the workshop, I'm going to fire your ass."

Smith says these were the kinds of moments that, when they were first approached about the reality show, made upper management nervous to let camera crews in. But Smith tells me he was never fazed by the idea.

"When you think about television and how you look on TV, I've been on the six o'clock news for a shootout, for a kidnapping, for drug possession and sales, so I'm thinking this isn't nearly anything,"

he says, explaining his own criminal past.

Smith is a 2002 graduate of the STRIVE program in New York, on which the job-readiness program is modeled. Fifty percent of Second Chance staffers are graduates.

Although some in upper management were nervous about how the program would look on television, Smith and others convinced them that it was a good idea. At the same time, Smith had no intention of hamming it up for the cameras.

"I told them this upfront. I said, 'Don't ask me to fabricate anything."

Every now and again, one of the camera people or producers would try to nudge him during the "on-the-fly interviews," to give a little more excitement to his demeanor and explanations.

"Sometimes, they'd say, 'You said it so passionately in there.' And I'm, like, 'That's because I was with them. I ain't excited about debriefing with you. I'm not going to stand there and make an ass of myself in front of a camera just because it gives you good ratings."

Although Smith doesn't watch a lot of TV, he is familiar with the formula of most reality shows, and he has no illusions about them being "real."

"We talked a lot with the film crews. And some of the staff — not the directors, not the producers, not the guys who were in charge, but... the guys on the ground that are doing the grunt work — they tell you a lot about reality TV, that it's not real. And for them, they really enjoyed this project because they had no clue, on any day, what was going to happen."



BULLFIGHT AT SWEETWATER

This event took place at the Sweetwater Rodeo Grounds in the spring of 1964. I have pictures.

Rodeo people christen bulls with colorful names. Country singer Tom Russell sang about East Texas Red. Chris LeDoux tells about Dust Devil Rage — there was a man killed by that bull in Jasper, Texas. Tim McGraw sings of a bull named Fu Manchu.

The three bulls that I came to know were Square Head, Freckles, and Sugarplum.

Bill Gresuk was a high school junior when I met him in Encanto in the mid-1960s. Bill had come out west from Pennsylvania to be with his uncle, Jim Lucidi, because he was interested in becoming a bullfighter. The close proximity to Mexico, he thought, would make it easier to break into the bullfighting world.

I was about 30 and had no thoughts of

being a professional — I was merely an aficionado, though keenly interested in learning the passes, the ins and outs of the sport. Bill and I both started training at the same time. Bill later left for the interior of Mexico, to seek his dream of becoming a matador.

In the beginning, though we hardly knew the difference between a cape and a piece of red-flannel underwear, we were eager to fight anything that charged.

We trained with more experienced Americans who had gleaned knowledge from expatriated *novilleros* (bullfighters restricted to fighting bulls less than four years of age) and retired matadors from Mexico. Later, we graduated to lessons from professionals in Mexico. Matador

de Toros "El Charro" Gómez was one who gave us a lot of help.

Living in the suburbs of an American city, we'd had little chance to see any type of bovine, let alone a fighting bull (*toro bravo*), and though our knowledge was meager, we were anxious to test out some of the maneuvers we were taught.

One day, we got fed up with the lack of

an animal to cape. We were bored with dry runs, a practice technique where one person would grab a set of horns and imitate the bull's charge. We wanted to face the real thing.

We came up with an idea, and on a sunny San Diego day, we hopped into my 1961



Triumph TR4 and headed for Bonita, in the foothills of southeastern San Diego, where we knew we would find cattle grazing in the pastures. Down a country road, we spotted a magnificent bull standing on the side of a hill. It was not a fighting-type bull, but this did not deter us. We were so hot to fight, we'd been considering caping cars on the freeway.

We leaped out of the TR4, grabbed the capes, and trudged up the hill. Our plan was to approach the bull from two directions — to corner it. The bull, a Hereford, glared at us as we ascended the steep slope. When we were about 40 yards away, the bull, perhaps startled by our intrusion, fled down the distant slope.

Foiled and panting, we tried cornering a few other bulls with the same results. Bright toreros that we were, we eventually came to the conclusion that this plan wasn't going to work. We later found out from the literature, and from other bullfighters, that bulls in the field seldom charge if they feel they're not cornered or trapped. Even bulls of fighting stock will ignore you or flee when confronted in the open. If bulls are in a herd, they most likely will not attack you.

That day, feeling somewhat discouraged and disappointed, we walked back to the car. We intended to call it a day. Driving home, we spotted a sign that read "Sweetwater Rodeo Grounds." Out of curiosity, we turned up the dirt road that led to a group of rustic buildings and corrals. This turned out to be a small rodeo set up with stalls for releasing bulls and broncs. We alit from the sports car and took a walk to examine the facilities. There wasn't a soul around, so we felt safe being there, and we ran head-on

to a pen with a large, tawny-colored bull. He was kind of ugly, with strange proportions. He pawed the earth and seemed agitated by our presence. Simultaneously, we both had the same thought: Let's fight this bull.

We contacted the rodeo owner and told him we wanted to put on a bullfight. We especially wanted to face that tawny bull, which we learned was named Square Head. To our surprise, the owner didn't think we were

Before we could proceed with the event, Bill and I were called into the office and informed that we would have to sign an agreement with the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals that stated that the bulls would not be harmed. How they knew we were trying to put on a bullfight and how they'd managed to find their way to the location, I don't know. Sweetwater Rodeo no longer exists, but at that time,

completely crazy.

We agreed on a date when the rodeo grounds were available, put out publicity, and prepared ourselves for the big day.

We were such greenhorns that we didn't have the proper garb, so we settled on dark pants and a white shirt. I added a sequined red tie, which I later realized was inappropriate.

When the day arrived, it was beautiful. The sun was shining, and there was hardly a breeze. This was important, because a wind could blow the cape around and make passes unmanageable.

This was in the 1960s. and CDs and cassettes hadn't been invented yet. I had an old Webcor tape deck with huge rolls of tapes onto which I'd recorded pasodobles such as "El Relicario," "España Cani," "Cielo Andaluz," and "La Virgen de la Macarena." The rodeo owner hooked up the music to the public-address system, and the mood was set. It made us feel as we were participating in the real thing.

it was ten miles southeast of downtown San Diego, in a cozy valley overlooking the Sweetwater Reservoir.

The local people from the villages of Spring Valley and Bonita, having heard about the "bullfight," began to fill the stands. There were about 30 spectators present, and they were mostly betting on the bull. "Get them, bully!" was one of the shouts heard.

The moment we were waiting for arrived. Square Head was in the holding pen, ready to be released whenever we gave the signal that we were ready.

I volunteered to be the first to meet him when the gate opened. I have to admit I was petrified with fear. What am I doing here? I thought. This is insane. I signaled to the cowboy above the gate to open it, and Square Head came rushing out of the chute. He charged at me immediately.

I realized that the smartest thing to do would be to give a wide cape pass (*capotazo*), to test how he would react. To my amazement, he was fooled by this initial pass. Square Head



continued to respond well to the cape, allowing me to make pass after pass. With each successful maneuver, I gained more confidence. After about ten decent passes, I turned it over to Bill Gresuk. He did some very creditable work — I was impressed with his ability and skill.

After a grueling half hour, we figured we had done as much as we could with Square Head. We signaled the cowboy to send the bull back to the corrals.

I breathed a sigh of relief that we'd survived the first onslaught. It's all over, I thought. But, no, it wasn't. The cowboys would not let us off the hook. They let out another bull, Sugar Plum. This was no ordinary bull. He appeared to be two stories high, and much meaner than Square Head.

In bullfighting, two types of capes are used. The larger, flamboyant cape is called the capote. The smaller and much lighter cape is called the *muleta*. The *muleta* is made from a gabardine-type material and is draped over a stick to give it dimension. The capote is usually made of silken fabric, and is used mainly in the first phase of the fight. The muleta is used in the last act, when the matador shows off his bravery and artistry working very close to the bull.

When Sugar Plum emerged on the scene, I should not have had the muleta in my hand. No way was this giant bull going to be fooled by the smaller cloth. Before I had a chance to switch back to the large cape, he came rushing toward me. It was like being attacked by a T. Rex. There was fire in his eyes, and he was definitely coming in for the kill. I was smart enough to realize I could not fight this terrifying animal as if he were a fighting bull from Spain. I shoved the muleta in his face and

began to lure him across the rodeo grounds. Lucky for me, the bull was focused on the *muleta*. After about five minutes of running about, Sugar Plum got tired of the game and suddenly stopped. Somewhat shaken, I turned it over to Bill. After this, the gentle Freckles was anti-climatic.

We made history that day. This may have been the first bullfight ever in San Diego County. Of course, it hardly resembled a true bullfight, but to us novices it was a great experience. Afterward, Bill's uncle, Jim Lucidi, took us to Felipe Zatarain's taco shop in Encanto. I know it sounds ridiculous, but we felt that we were true matadors. Our heads swelled till they were larger than our sense, but it was an afternoon we have never forgotten.

In retrospect, it became clear that rodeo-type bulls do not charge like Spanish fighting bulls. Spanish bulls charge straight and true. The domestic types wade in on you, like a Tony Galento-type boxer. Rodeo bulls have also been handled many times by men on foot, and therefore become wise to distractions like capes — they usually aim right for the body of the man. Bill and I were lucky we came out unscathed, and we were especially lucky Square Head was fooled by the cape.

Some time later, I had an experience in Tijuana fighting a bull that had wised up to what was going on. At a ring where local Mexican cowboys (charros) put on festivals, they kept a bull that had been caped dozens of times. It was about three or four years old. They called him El Regional and let him out during the festivals, perhaps to add color to the proceedings. Aspiring matadors were allowed to try their hand at caping him.

Of course, having been

fought so many times, this bull knew that the cape was no longer his enemy. Whenever he came out, there was mayhem, with scattered bodies on the ground. But I was not privy to this when I first went to Tijuana to learn about bullfighting. When I heard they were going to let out a bull for the public to fight, I jumped at the chance.

The arena was a ring pretty much like a bullring, but more rustic and worn. I had been taught that a bull charging along the edge of the ring had a tendency to move toward the center when he encounters a bullfighter. This, I figured, was an advantage. So I planted myself against the boards with my cape in hand, ready for El Regional.

He came shooting out of the gate, running along the fence toward me. Just before he reached me, I moved my cape to distract his charge, but he ignored the cape and caught me in a direct hit. I went flying through the air like Charlie Brown after Lucy removes the football. As I lay crumpled on the ground, one of my Mexican friends asked, "¿Qué pasó, Riki?"

I am perhaps the first Japanese-American who has indulged in bullfighting. Quite a few Americans have been bitten by the bug to fight bulls — John Fulton, Robert Ryan, Sidney Franklin, and David Renk are all men who have achieved the title of Matador de Toros. Raquel Martinez of Imperial Beach is that rare woman who has also reached this prestigious goal. Peter Rombold is perhaps the most successful amateur, having fought and killed over 60 bulls in Mexico and Spain.

You probably can't defend bullfighting from a moral standpoint. But are those animal activists still eating steak? ■

the bubble keeps expanding. Heywood Sanders, who says the glut will get worse, puts much of the blame on consulting firms that tell every city that a new or expanded center will boost the local economy. "It's easy enough to build the sucker," says Sanders. "The question is whether you can get any appreciable increase in business. When the best cases I can find are Las Vegas and Orlando doubling the size of their centers and getting a 10 percent to 15 percent increase in attendance, I don't think there will be much boost at all for San Diego." Apparently, says Sanders, "San Diego is building into a perfect storm."

But local center plans go forward. The villain is a political juggernaut: the establishment corporate welfare machine aligned with organized labor. What politician, Republican or Democrat, can resist such pressure?

Initially, organized labor joined activist Mel Shapiro and lawyer Cory Briggs in the lawsuit that shows how the City's maneuver is blatantly illegal. (Technically, the opponents are defendants because the City last year filed a validation lawsuit to permit a judge to rule on the matter.) Even City Attorney Jan Goldsmith has reservations about the City's case. Chuckles Shapiro, "[The City] said, 'Do you want to settle?' and we said, 'The settlement is to go to the ballot."

In November, organized labor backed out of the case. In return, the contractor for the proposed expansion granted unions a socalled project labor agreement, guaranteeing workers local hiring and unionlevel wages and benefits. In a word, the deal stinks. So does politics. Mayor Bob Filner, who had campaigned for a public vote on the convention center, now says he will back it if the court and

Coastal Commission give it the nod.

Convention centers are "holes in the ground that governments throw money into," says Briggs. He points out several additional problems: "The City should have done the [environmental] analysis, not the Port. It's the City's project," he says. Any environmental analysis should be done before there is an approval. But, "The City approved this taxpayer scam before the [environmental] document was finished. The mayor [former mayor Jerry Sanders] and council were gung ho, singing its praises before the document was released."

The Coastal Commission will consider a number of things. The possibility of a rising sea level resulting from climate change should come up. The project further shuts off views of the bay. And, "You don't need to expand a convention center on the water. It is not waterdependent," says Briggs. The City claims it will put a park on the roof of the center. Briggs has one word for that: "bullshit."

That word applies to the propaganda coming from expansion backers. They cite figures showing how the center propels the San Diego economy — for example, purportedly adding \$21 billion to regional coffers since it opened more than 20 years ago. But in a Reader article in December of 2011, Heywood Sanders showed how the convention center falsely inflates those numbers. Last year, city auditor Eduardo Luna confirmed it. But in the discussion about the convention center, the book-cooking barely came up, according to sources who followed the discussions.

Briggs sums it up: San Diego politicians "don't give a damn about false numbers. False numbers, schmaltz numbers." ■

up their small cones and peg the seven-foot hoop to the ground for the goal.

On this Saturday in January, less than a week after hard rains pelted the area, the Bermuda grass is green and plentiful. There is no evidence of any wear-and-tear. There are no signs posted stating that cleats are prohibited at city parks. In fact, there is no law that outlaws cleats.

"I've searched city code for laws about cleats at city parks and couldn't find anything," says attorney and regular Goaltimate player Chris Vaughan before lining up for the game. "It's funny, you visit the city's Park and Recreation website and you see these 19 tenets the city posted about the virtue of parks. They include things like 'be happier, feel great, lose weight, reduce stress, create memories, build family unity, build self esteem.' These are all the things that we do here."

Despite the players' good intentions, city rangers have been ordered to clear the field of cleats. Fueling these orders are the complaints trickling in from one or two people.

"Once again, [a control line flier] called me on my cell phone about soccer players wearing cleats at Ski Beach," wrote ranger Steve Waldman to senior park ranger Lori Charett-Gerbac in a November 3 email obtained through a public records request. "He asked if the Mission Bay park rangers ever enforce the rules."

Those rules, however, are not so clear-cut.

On November 19, Charett-Gerbac sent an email to park rangers. "We received a complaint via [San Diego Police Department] regarding soccer players wearing cleats and uniforms. Please contact the groups, ensure they are not wearing cleats, only turf shoes, bibs/aprons

if they must and have small goals, not the huge ones and are respecting others space, etc., and adhering to park [regulations]."

Charett-Gerbac asked the rangers to distribute a city flyer that reads: "Per the San Diego Municipal Code it is illegal to: delineate playing fields, wear cleated footwear, set up goals or nets, compete on established teams wearing a team uniform, employ a referee, schedule to play with an organized league."

Four hours later, the senior park ranger sent another email. "Allow me to clarify...there is a [San Diego Municipal Code] regarding organized sports in parks, there is not a [San Diego Municipal Code] about wearing cleats, having goals, referees, uniforms."

Without a specific law that prohibits cleats, the city's Park and Recreation Department has turned to the vaguer notion of "department standard" to condemn cleats. On December 5, Charett-Gerbac responded to pleas from Pugh and other soccer players. "While we understand your desire to wear cleats to avoid injury, they are not allowed in the park. Mission Bay Park is considered a passive recreation park area. It is a Park and Recreation Department standard to regulate traditional cleated

footwear in Mission Bay Park and other passive recreation areas due to grass damage, wear and tear and effects on park users."

Then Charett-Gerbac sent another email to rangers. "Please continue to enforce the no-cleats policy, we got another complaint that the turf is torn up and the Frisbee football guys are apparently the culprits at Ski Beach where the control line fliers fly."

The soccer and frisbee players don't feel that one or two people's complaints should result in a more strict interpretation of city law. They resent the accusations that they are destroying Ski Beach. "Look," says Goaltimate player Vaughan, "We are all about stewardship. We are not going to abuse this field. We appreciate access to this park and we want to improve it for everyone. If anything, this whole ordeal has only made us more mindful of the field and what we can do to make it better. I just hope the city feels the same." ■

Fatal DUI crash gets ten-year sentence

Debbie Pacheco Sumi read a statement that she is "sorry"

There were so many people waiting to hear the verdict, Debbie Sumi's sentencing was moved to a larger room in the North County courthouse.

Vista — There were so many people waiting to hear the sentencing that the case was moved to a larger room upstairs in San Diego's North County courthouse yesterday afternoon.

On February 1, more than 40 people crowded into judge Runston Maino's courtroom to hear statements from the family of the victims, supporters of the convicted woman, and Debbie Sumi herself.

A jury had declared Sumi guilty of three counts of gross vehicular manslaughter while intoxicated after a two-week trial in October 2012.

Sumi, then 33, and her bovfriend Larry Alvarez. 34, were in a Jeep that ran into a black Nissan that

was parked on the side of Highway 78. The boyfriend, who is the father of two of Sumi's four children, did not survive the crash that night in August 2010.

Sumi denied being the driver of the Jeep that night, instead placing the blame on Alvarez.

The other two people who were killed, Susana Orozco and Erica Oliva, both 23, were standing outside the Nissan when it was struck. A survivor testified that they pulled over onto the side of the highway because one of the women felt sick.


Jacobs: "I'm out"

Mayor Filner announces his support for park location after Plaza de Panama is defeated

Balboa Park — The drama over Earth Day at Balboa Park can finally be put to rest.

One day after superiorcourt judge Timothy Taylor struck down the controversial Plaza de Panama project, mayor Bob Filner announced the annual Earth Day Fair is back on.

They said the construction would not only create safety hazards but would put a strain on museums and businesses in the park.



Zurich: Switzerland's Secret to Success

The Economist ranks Switzerland the best country "to be born in 2013." Zurich, the largest Swiss metropolis (380,000 residents) has been voted the planet's best city by Mercer Human Resource Consulting, Monocle, and others. Why?

Surrounded by France, Germany, Italy, and Austria, Switzerland is technically landlocked; but considering the mountainous country's many lakes, it's arguably a nautical nation. To make a grand entrance into the so-called "Little Big City" at the northwestern end of Lake

Zurich, I board a boat that provides the most picturesque mass transit this side of the Staten Island Ferry. Skipping the trains, I take my time. The ferry crosses Zürichsee, Switzerland's sixth-largest lake, embraced by the Alps.

As I bask on deck in the summer sunshine, we float past villages hugging the lake, such as Rapperswil, with its 13th-century castle. Nearing the harbor, Zurich's medieval-and-modern skyline beckons.

Largely spared fires and wars, peaceful Switzerland sports some of Europe's best surviving medieval architecture. The boat wafts past guild houses — established by trade associations in the Middle Ages, they're social clubs today — passing Zunft Zum Kämbel, the food dealers and wine merchants' guild, bearing a plaque with a golden camel and half moon, plus the carpenters' "House of the Red Eagle," with its peaked red roof and upstairs fine-dining restaurant Zunfthaus Zur Zimmerleuten.

Old Town's main cathedrals are also visible: Fraumünster, famed for Marc Chagall's stained-glass windows; twintowered Grossmünster, founded in the 12th Century by Charlemagne, whose

enthroned, crowned, sword-wielding image is sculpted into the southern tower and onto a bronze door; and St. Peter, boasting Europe's largest clock face. As the boat nears Zürichsee we move from the sacred to the profane, as topless women lounge at a ladies' swim club while swans frolic in the water.

Ambling about Old Town is my favorite thing to do in Zurich, so I stay at the Widder Hotel in Altstadt, near Bahnhofstrasse. Its rooftop offers a 360-degree view of medieval and modern Zurich. A marvel of design, the Widder is composed from nine age-old townhouses built as far back as 1066, artfully unified into a single property by Swiss architect Tilla Theus. Classic meets contemporary: wooden beams, mouth-blown window glass, and 13th-century ornately painted ceilings commingle with Giacomettis, Rauschenbergs, Warhols, Corbusier

recliners, Frank Lloyd Wright furniture, a glass-enclosed elevator, and techno-gym.

The five-star offers free mini-bars and espresso machines in each of its 49 units. Its Library of Spirits has 400 whiskeys and a pianist. Morning repasts are served in the airy Breakfast Pavilion, complete with a glass ceiling.



NORTH SHORE - LAKE HODGES DAM

A walk to the Hodges Dam and back through coastal sage scrub habitat

Distance from downtown San Diego: 33 miles. Allow 45 minutes driving time. From I-15, take exit 27 for Via Rancho Pkwy and turn left (west) onto E Via Rancho Pkwy for 3.2 miles, then left (south) again on Lake Dr. for 0.8 mile, just past Ash Lane if starting at Del Dios Community Park for the longer walk or another

1.2 miles to the parking lot across from Hernandez Hideaway, near the junction of Lake and Rancho drives. **Hiking length**: approximately 6 miles from Del Dios Community Park or 4 miles from the Rancho/Lake Dr. parking lot to dam and back. Please keep a "passing lane" available for the multipurpose use of hikers, runners, and bicyclists. There is shore fishing, and private boats are allowed as the water level allows. Dogs on a leash permitted. Difficulty: Easy, with little elevation gain/loss on both dirt and paved surface of the perimeter road.

he 346 square miles San Dieguito River watershed starts from runoff on the southern slope of Volcan Mountain, with tributaries of Santa Ysabel, Santa Maria, and Temescal creeks through the Ramona Grasslands to the ocean via the San Dieguito Lagoon in Del Mar. The watershed includes five reservoirs that include lakes Sutherland, Poway, and Hodges. Lake Hodges, with its maximum depth of 115 feet and 27 miles of shoreline, is contained within the San Dieguito River Park.

This hike starts either at the Del Dios Community Park on a 1.2-mile-long dirt path that parallels Lake Drive or at the parking lot across from Hernandez Hideaway to continue 1.9 miles to the Rattlesnake viewpoint just below

the Lake Hodges Dam and back to your starting point.

Once on the second section, follow the dirt path past an SDG&E switchyard, the Olivenhain Pipeline pump house directly opposite the buoys surrounding the water inlet/

to the right past a short hairpin turn, then at the intersection of a paved road, turn left to continue on Lake Dr. After a short distance, the pavement ends, becoming a fire road that veers to the right.

Close to where the fire road again becomes a dirt path that parallels Del Dios Highway, a rusting car looks to have missed a turn. Continue on the path to the end of the parking area, where there is a break in the fence. The trail turns left and down to the Rattlesnake overlook.

Take a break before returning by looking through the pipe scope to points A and B at the 1918 Hodges multiplearch dam funded by the Santa Fe Railroad. The reservoir was then purchased by the City of San Diego in 1925; the main customers are the Santa Fe Irrigation and San Dieguito Water districts. Point C is the San Dieguito River continuing its journey to the Pacific Ocean.

Bring your binoculars to enjoy the birding in California's first site formally recognized in 1999 as a Globally Important Bird Area. This was mainly due to the California gnatcatchers found in the equally endangered coastal sage scrub habitat that is found around the lake. Also of interest are the Western and Clark's grebes, hawks, osprey,

and ducks.

Plants along the trails include California sagebrush, cactus, laurel sumac, and lemonade berry. Some people are sensitive to the last two, as they are members of the sumac (or cashew) family the same family as poison oak.

Canyoneers are San Diego Natural History Museum volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks that teach appreciation for the great outdoors. For a schedule of free public hikes, refer to the San Diego Natural History Museum website.





head thalasso shower and high-tech CD player. Service is always lickety-split, proving the Widder's watchword: "At home in Zurich."

During my Widder stay, I trek along Zürichsee to Wollishofen to behold Theater Spektakel, an annual outdoor happening of international cuttingedge performances. Bangkok's Pichet Klunchun Dance Company combines Thai and avant-garde choreography with athleticism. While they're dancing lakeside onstage, it starts to pour, but in that "show must go on!" tradition, the hoofers continue without missing a beat.

Too rainy to walk to the hotel, I dash aboard a departing vessel, which crosses the lake instead of returning to Zurich. Upon disembarking I hop onto a tram bound toward the Widder, wetter but wiser.

In September I cover the eighthannual Zurich Film Festival, headquartered near the 19th-century opera house. Oliver Stone's Savages launches the film fest. At a press conference, I ask the

antiwar Platoon director how it feels to be in a country that hasn't fought a war for 164 years.

Herein lies the explanation why Swiss babies are Earth's luckiest and Zurich is so stellar.

I lunch with Green Party parliamentarian Alec von Graffenried in Clouds, a splendid restaurant atop Switzerland's tallest building, Prime Tower, located in Zurich West, a former factory district converted into an artsy, shoppingand-dining area. Discussing the Swiss military budget, von Graffenried says it's 3 percent of government expenditures and that he wants to cut it.

Switzerland's prosperity owes at least as much to its neutrality policy as to those secretive banking laws. Excluding the Vatican, Swiss mercenaries are long gone.

If a country doesn't bankrupt itself on empire and wars, it has money for preserving nature, culture, and citizens' needs. Minus militarism and a violenceobsessed culture, people can live crimefree in peace; children can go to school to learn — instead of to be shot at.

Elegy for Kenneth Koch A poem by Fred Moramarco

d. July 6, 2002

It seems too crazy, like one of your mad, funny poems, that you're not with us anymore, not here to point out the thisness of things, like mountains, circuses, and fresh air. You were always the court jester of poets, toppling pretension from its granite and marble heights. "Look," you would say, about this or that, "how absolutely strange, marvelous, and ordinary it is, like everything else you will meet on your daily rounds." You noticed the blueness of blue, the curvature of the round, the still beats of silence within seconds. One of my favorites of your lines is "To learn of cunnilingus at fifty argues a wasted life." This from your poem,

"Some General Instructions," which pings in my head even today. Ah, Kenneth, the obit said it was leukemia and you were 77. Hard to imagine either. You, a frail old man, eaten by blood cells. I rarely saw you when you weren't laughing, darting here and there. I remember we wrote a sestina in your class,

each student writing a line as the poem went around the room. I wrote the last line of that poem, and remember it forty years later because you thought it was the perfect ending:

"Who would have guessed at such a meaning for summer?" And I say that again, for this summer, when you're no longer here: Who would have guessed at such a meaning for summer?



Fred (Federico) Moramarco, who died on February 13, 2012, is the author and editor of several books, including Containing Multitudes: Poetry in the U.S. since 1950; Men of Our Time, (an anthology of world poetry); and Deliciously Italian, a book about Italian cooking and cuisine. He was a poet,

literary critic, professor of literature at SDSU, producer, director, and actor. He was the founding editor of Poetry International, coproduced the award-winning Hannah and Martin at the Lyceum Theatre in 2006, and performed at the Old Globe, the San Diego Rep, Sledgehammer, Diversionary Theatre, and with other San Diego theater companies. This poem, "Elegy for Kenneth Koch," was awarded a Pushcart Prize in 2012 after it appeared in *Poetry International* #17. It was also published in his 2010 collection The City of Eden, published by Laterthanever Productions, and is reprinted here by permission. A much loved member of the Southern California literary and theater community, Moramarco died of cardiac arrest the evening before Valentine's Day. The innovative New York poet Kenneth Koch had been a teacher of Moramarco's back when they were both young men living in New York. The author's photo is by Paul Savage.



Rupert Brooke (1887–1915) was an English poet most famous for his war sonnets written during World War I ("If I should die, think only this of me:/That there's some corner of a foreign field/ That is forever England..." etc.). Strikingly handsome, Brooke epitomized the youthful English flower mowed down by the

cruelty of the so-called "Great War." Ironically, although Brooke enlisted in the British Army to fight in the war, he died before seeing action, succumbing to an infected mosquito bite. Brooke was a representative of the Georgian poets and a member of the Bloomsbury group of writers. While some of his poetry is dated, other works have transcended their day especially those like "Peace," which appears in his most popular book, 1914 & Other Poems.



We're talkin' cavemen

"When we humans started farming 10,000 years ago," June says, "we went off the rails."

hat song "Up on the Roof" keeps ringing through my head. Because that's where we are — up on the roof of the Whole

Foods at Seventh and University in Hillcrest, 7:00 at night.

Me and shadowy figures and three food trucks parked in an L-shape.

I've come for the first one. It's the same color as the Coaster, that light bluey-green. Called

"Not So Fast!" They tweeted they'd be here tonight, serving up food that's got me curious. Food that our ancestors ate for two-and-a-half million years. The paleo diet — we're talkin' cavemen.

At least, that's the promise. A notice stuck to

a window on the side of the truck reads:

"Not So Fast! is a unique mobile kitchen that specializes in fresh, wholesome, nutritious meals on the go. Utilizing local farms and sustainable sources...we offer truly healthy fare..."

Uh-huh. Here, I'm starting to tune out, because isn't every restaurant in town telling us the same thing? Local, sustainable, nutritious...

But now it gets more interesting. I get in line and continue reading.

"...that is gluten-free, soy-free, sugar-free, grain-free, legume-free, with no preservatives... All our sandwiches are served on lettuce wraps, unless otherwise specified. We do not encourage the use of grains or gluten."

I first discovered these guys at a Third Friday food-truck gathering at 57 Degrees, the wine shop in Middletown. I had an "El Pavo Diablo," a turkey burger, with "grilled jalapeños, roasted red peppers, and spicy garlic aioli, \$8.

Lots of other things were up on the markerboard menu, like bison burger (\$11) and beef,

pork, and mushroom burgers (\$8-\$10), plus wild-cod tacos (\$9). (It's hard to imagine our caveman granddaddies recognizing any of these foods in this form, but the "now" and the "then" have to meet somewhere.) The turkey was meaty,

spicy, and, with the bacon and avocado, tasty. I asked for it in a bun, too, which you could see they didn't want to do.

So: meat, good; bun, bad. What's going on? We're not talking vegan, or even vegetarian,

That's why I'm back tonight: I want to know why we'd return to eating what our distant ancestors chowed down on.

Plus, last time, I saw two dishes that I wanted to try — the bison burger (\$11) and the "Bomb-Bomb Hash" (\$5), "sweetpotato hash loaded with avocado and

house-cured bacon."

The Not So Fast food truckers fix fare that our

hunter-gatherer ancestors would have liked.

Now I'm at the front of the line. I do one more check of the board, see a sweet-and-sour spicy pork. "Julian, California, pastured pork sloppy joe with pineapple, scallions, house-cured bacon, and primal sweet-and-sour pepper reduction," \$10.

Sounds delish, but I stick with plan A, the bison burger, "with red wine, caramelized onions," and, wow, "Kerrygold grass-fed cheese." (Grass-fed cheese? Imagining cheeses happily munching out in a field...) I also get the Bomb-Bomb Hash. Not cheap, but we're talking organic prices. The bison's \$12 — extra dollar's for avocado — and it's \$5 for the hash.

Seventeen buckeroos. But if it reintroduces me to grandpa and to the right way to eat, it'll be worth it. (Only 400 generations separate us from our pre-agricultural, Stone Age ancestors — I looked it up.)

June takes my order. She and her partner Bob run this truck, and they reckon they're the only Paleolithic food truck on the West Coast.

"When we humans started farming 10,000 years ago," June says, "we went off the rails. My partner Bob, the chef here, was getting sick on all the glutens and excess sugars and salts of the normal diet. Then we heard about the paleo diet, eating what our stomachs had evolved over millions of years to handle — meats, plants — and not what we've thrown at them over just the last 10,000. Grains, sugars, salts, glutens, dairy, processed food. So we switched to eating paleo. And Bob's condition cleared up."

"The gut is our number-one organ," says Bob, as he brings over my two paper plates of food. "You've got to look after it. A month after I switched to this diet, my allergy problems with glutens cleared up. It makes sense."

Whatever. This food makes it easy to adapt. The hash is sweet, interesting with the bacon and avo adds. The lettuce-wrapped "burger" takes getting used to, but the taste is there, and the "house-cured" bacon is thick and flavorful. And, hey, at the bottom they've put some plantain chips, little dried banana-type slices to chew on.

Couple sharing a fish taco ("Grilled true

cod, with jalapeños, avocado, and primal Sriracha"...not sure about "true," but "primal" means no preservatives or stuff like xanthan gum and sodium bisulphate), Tony and Tess, believe this helps keep them healthy. "I'm a pescatarian," says Tony. "Only eat fish."

Meaning, I guess, that fish is the only "meat" he eats, but not the only food.

The group of gals next to them have a dish called "Wich Came First?" It's "free-range pulled chicken with fried egg, bacon, pico de gallo."

"I've got an auto-immune problem," says Rianne. "I started eating paleo last September. It's working. I'd always have painful rashes. Now I feel less bloated, the rashes have gone down from eight on the pain scale to a three, and I sleep. And how beautiful that is. Every time I bust out and eat gluten, soy, or dairy, I get stomach aches."

Suddenly, it's 7:30. Cinderella time. Vehicles have to be out and off the roof. June lowers the sides of the truck and locks them.

It's a little strange, here in the half-light, a clump of food-truck fanatics up on the roof of a market, chowing and chatting away.

But, kinda wonderful, you have to feel. And maybe these guys are onto something, calling the food industry out on a massive agricultural experiment gone wrong, saying they're not willing to be the lab rats anymore.

Hey, maybe grandma (times 400) did know best. ■

East Village's littlest burger?

This is so typical. I'd been watching this corner (Sixth and G) for months, waiting for these guys

Then, when it happened, I blinked, got distracted. It's only the other day, when I'm wander-

ing, lonely as a cloud, that I notice an arresting face at the, well, counter.

Sarah. Says they're open. Have been since October.

It's in a brand-new building, but it's all grayblue industrial, with roll-up streetside windows and a big U-shaped counter in the middle. Guess I'm going to sit down because now I'm curious.

The idea is like Which Wich sandwich places:

you get a chart on a clipboard and you check off what kind of burger you want, like 1/3 lb? 2/3 lb? Beef? Turkey? Blue? Feta? Baby spinach? Pineapple? The basic seems to cost around \$9.

Hadn't intended to eat right now, but as they say, a burger in hand's worth two in the bush. And, besides, Sarah has already handed me the menu

and — hey! — a happy-hour menu.

Turns out this place is part of a mighty chain. Dozens and dozens. Like, over two-dozen outlets in California, more in half a dozen other states, plus still more in a dozen other countries, including the UK and half the Middle East. Dozen get bigger than that, heh-heh.

They have two in San Diego, at Del Mar (Del Mar Highlands Town Center, 12873 El Camino Real, 858-481-9821), and here (695 Sixth Avenue, downtown, 619-810-1850), and another coming at Lindbergh Field.

So, big chain, but turns out it has the smallest burger I've ever eaten.

I'm here at around five at night and feeling

my eyes on the happy-hour menu, and first thing that pops out: "\$2 mini cheeseburger."

They also have a rack of deals with half-off appetizers (this HH is from 3:00-6:00 p.m., Monday to Friday). So, a bowl of chili would be \$2.50, sweet-potato fries would be less than a buck for a single order, and chili-cheese fries would be \$2.75 — and that's for the larger size.

FEAST!

I go for the mini-burger, just to see how mini it is. Also an iced tea. It costs more than the burger,

\$2.75. (Kick myself on that, because now I see they have draft Arrogant Bastard for \$4, just \$1.25 more. Sigh.)

Okay, so when it comes, this little burger is on a little plate, but, well, actually it's not so little. It's thick, nicely grilled, with melted cheddar (looks like) on top, plus chopped red onions and a pot of sweet red relish. Crunchy toasted bun, too.

I thought it was gonna be gone in one gulp.

But, nope. Actually, I stretch it out to quite a few scrumptious chomps. And by the time I'm done, I could leave satisfied. Best two bucks I've spent in ages.

'Course, never could leave well enough alone. The menu's still standing in front of me, and next time Sarah comes by, I order the chilicheese fries.

And, yes, it's big, the thin fries are crunchy,

and there's plenty of chili. This would've more than done it as a meal on its own. But once I'm back on the street, it's the thought of that beautiful little burger that stays with me, that I'd come back for.

Whole lot cost me \$8.10. If I'd just had water it would've been \$6.35. If I'd stuck with the burger,

Off Days are On Days

I never saw an episode of *Cheers* — the show was before my time — but I get the gist, as I've heard home, where "everybody knows your name, and they're always glad you came." With this in mind, I consider Starlite San Diego to be my "Cheers."

Us Norms and Cliffs know that the best time to "take a break from all our worries" at Starlite is during off-peak hours. It doesn't matter how many people know your name when a place is packed on a Friday or Saturday night - you're not getting a table, and that's the way it should be: first come, first served. I prefer quieter times, when instead of focusing on the scenesters in all their hip and creative regalia, I can concentrate on a well-crafted cocktail and chef Kathleen Wise's ever-changing fresh and locally sourced culinary creations.

Sunday brunch (with my go-to cocktail, the Holly Golightly) is a soothing and satisfying way to slow to a stop at the end of a freewayfrenetic weekend. The best way to start off brunch with a group of friends is coffee and an order or two of the crullers — dense and not-too-sweet donuts created by pastry chef Mandy Hendricks.

On our most recent brunch visit, David and I brought along a few friends from out of town. I'm not a breakfasty-egg person, so my brunch pick is also my late-night-dinner pick, which is the Starlite Burger. Brandt beef, gruyere cheese, and caramelized onions on a brioche bun. The only difference between the burger at brunch and at night is that, instead of fries, this one is served with hot, crispy-on-the-outside, soft-onthe-inside potatoes, which are more "home fries" than shoestring.

David got the Chorizo and Eggs, with housemade chorizo, which he described as "mild but enjoyable." It's served with sour cream, potatoes, and tortillas. One of our friends had the same dish. She described it in one word: "Yum."

Another friend ordered the daily special: figstuffed French toast (vanilla-scented French toast stuffed with fig jam and cream cheese, served with real maple syrup and whipped butter), with a side of "Kathleen's housemade sausage." The rest of us didn't get a taste, it was gone so quickly, but my friend exclaimed several times how surprised she was that there could be so many different flavors in the sausage patty. She also pointed out her surprise at how tender and juicy it was, rather than the dry piece of meat she'd usually expect. "I wish I could just order a plate full of these," she said.

When it comes to dinner, our favorite night is Tapas Tuesday. Each week, Chef Kathleen devises a special menu of \$6 small plates (\$15 for three). When most people are settling into their week and

staying at home, David and I seize the opportunity to grab a seat at the bar, where we can chat with Braden, Jack, or Dmitri; or take a table, so we can catch up with Colleen or José. Either way, we are always visited by another friendly face — Roy the manager, who bustles from bar to table to patio and back again.

On a frigid night during the recent cold snap, David and I made the short drive (we'd usually walk, but I don't do outside below 40 degrees) for Tapas Tuesday. It was Roy who recommended the "Hearty Beef Vegetable Soup," served with sour cream Worcestershire salt. Paired with a smooth and balanced hot toddy that Jack whipped up for me, I went from shivering beneath a scarf and hood to slowly unwrapping myself as I warmed

The Moroccan Style Flatbread with spiced carrot purée, charred cauliflower, and sweet pickled raisins was pleasantly crispy and covered in cool textures and flavors.

My favorite bite of the evening was an item on the regular menu. The vegetarian dishes change more frequently than the seasons, so when I see a new one, I don't miss the opportunity to taste it — it is here that Chef Kathleen truly shines, as it is with the seasonal veggies that she gets her most creative (as with the Moroccan flatbread). This dish was a Broccoli Pot Pie, with





Win cash at Old Mill Cafe

Old Mill Cafe is trying to buy my loyalty. And yours, too. All of our loyalties. With cold, hard cash. Yup, that's right, this family-style restaurant in North Park is, as far as I know, the only restaurant with "Win Cash!" emblazoned on the front wall. The deal is as follows: every meal comes with an entry into a drawing for \$100. No information is given about when or how this drawing goes down, which makes it seem like a Mafia lottery or something, but since the restau has nothing to gain by deception, I have to assume the raffle occurs as it should. I filled out the little ticket that came with my check at the end of the meal and I'm expecting a call in good time.

Bedford likes Old Mill for breakfast and I would second that. I can't really fault a restaurant that posts on its Facebook page a picture of a cat flying through space on a piece of bacon. They even credit the image source. Good Guy Old Mill Cafe.

Whatever, it's refreshing to have a bright welcome to Horton Plaza, even while the big demolitions are going on across the

I head inside to the bar sec-

tion. It's buzzing with the endof-week post-work crowd. Bit worried about costs here. They all look kinda prosperous.

And I see dishes like "Port Townsend Seafood Simmer," which sounds delicious, with scallops, clams, mussels, shrimp, fish all in there, but, uh...\$25.

Then I see the little stand-up menu on the counter. The saving words: "Happy Hour menu." "Spike's favorite hour," it says. Turns out Spike Africa was one of the legendary trading-schooner captains of the Pacific. This fish place kinda memorializes him.

So, drink deals, of course, but also food. "Fresh shucked oysters, \$1 each," it says, right up top.

"A shuck for a buck," says this guy surrounded by lots of women and lots of food. Kevin. Lawyer. Been a fan since this place opened three weeks ago. "Hey, that's good," he says. "Buck a shuck!"

Then the menu says you get half off all appetizers, in the "Under Way" section of the menu.

Now Kristin, behind the counter, is waiting for an order, and other customers are clamoring

So I order the cheapest beer

(Bud Light, 20 ounces for \$4). Then hit the HH menu. Oh, man. There's a lot in here. I land on one, then two, then, daggone it, can't resist a third.

I go for the a mug of clam chowder (\$3 during happy hour), a "seaside oyster roast," which is a "Rockefeller-style" mess of oysters and lots of other stuff, for \$6 — oh, and that live buck-a-shuck oyster (\$1), too.

Have to say: I've hit pay dirt

For starters, that oyster... I have a choice of a Fanny Bay oyster from British Columbia or a Kumai, from Baja. Smaller but tastier, says Kristin. I go for size: Fanny Bay. Big, lush, and with a spritz of lemon and red cocktail sauce, delish.

Then that chowder. Man, it's a meal in itself. "Clams, king crab, scallions, Fanny Bay oysters, celery, onion, croutons, and heavy cream," says Kristin. "No wheat or roux. So it's not gloopy and glutinous like most chowders you get."

Really, it's one of the best I can remember. And filling.

But when the oyster roast turns up...four big shells filled with a mess of stuff that Kristin says includes smoked bacon, spinach, parmesan cheese, those Fanny bay oysters, heavy cream, and Pernod, that licorice-flavored French liqueur... I mean, four of these for six bucks.

Totally scrumbulicious. And, for everything, I'm 15 bucks lighter. Plus, I come outta there bloated. Couldn't even finish my Bud Light.

Luckily, the bus stop's only half a block away.

Bottom line, gotta come again, try other dishes. I'll report back. 'Cause, hey, have we mentioned who Spike Africa was?

Italian Street Food at Monello in Little Italy

Following in the footsteps of their Little Italy predecessors, when Bencotto Italian Kitchen owners (chef Fabrizio Cavallini, Valentina DiPietro, and Guido Nistri) were looking to open a new Italian restaurant, they did so right next door to their successful existing one. So it is that Monello: Italian Street Cuisine shares a wall with Bencotto in the Q building.

I've eaten my way across several regions in Italy (Florence in Tuscany, Rome in Lazio, Trevi and Perugia in Umbria, Venice in Veneto), but I have yet to make it to Milan in Lombardy.

My only experience with Italian street food was found in Venice, in the form of cicchetti bars, which are similar to the tapas bars in Spain. You tend to stand instead of sit, and order pre-made items by pointing at what you want behind the bar. In Italy happy hour, or aperitivo time, it is a laid-back, often several-hours-long stretch to sip cocktails, socialize, and enjoy shared plates. Aperitivo hour begins at around 5 p.m., and dinner is typically at 9 or 10 p.m. Apparently, Milan has been known as "the capital of aperitivo" since the early 1900s.

Our friends Mana and David made it to Monello before me and my David and invited us to return with them. I checked out the website in advance and read about the "secret 27-ingredient recipe for homemade vermouth." David (not mine, the other one) ordered a cocktail I'd never heard of, one that is entirely vermouth. I always thought of vermouth as nothing more than a mixer. The "rock twist" is sweet vermouth on ice with an orange twist. Though my friends urged me to order it, there was no way I could get anything but the "vecchio stile." It was bourbon based, and I'm on a bourbon kick. But it also

included chinato, a flavor I first sampled at Noble Experiment, in a drink prepared by the masterful cocktail king Anthony Schmidt. Unlike vermouth, which is flavored with wormwood, chinato's taste comes from China bark. I find it to be spicier and less bitter than even the sweetest vermouth.

David ordered the "corpse reviver," a classic cognac cocktail. This one featured slices of apple and sweet vermouth with the cognac.

With our drinks came complimentary seasoned lupini beans. They have a thicker outer casing that you bite to get to the nugget of soft bean inside.

Seated at the table beside us was a familiar face — Mari Payton of NBC San Diego. After catching up a bit, I let her return to dinner with her friend, but not before making note of an interesting-looking dish on her table, which we ended up ordering.

The dish was a sliced flatbread wrap, similar to lavash, filled with arugula, parma prosciutto, and burrata. We enjoyed the flavors, but all agreed that even with four people, it's a filler-upper. We would have been happy to have shared half the amount given.













Our server recommended the "panzerotti," which are "lightly fried mini calzones." Our friends agreed — they'd ordered this appetizer on their first visit. Here the portion issue was just the opposite of the wrap. We were four, and they served a plate with three of the little football-shaped goodies. I felt this was a failing on our server's part, who could have easily requested an extra from the kitchen so that each of us could have one. Especially because they were so delicious, the two at our table who sacrificed a half were disappointed to not have a whole gyoza-sized piece to themselves.

Next to arrive was the polenta. Of white or yellow, we chose the latter, with the porcini mushroom and ricotta topping option (other toppings include sausage, gorgonzola cheese, and spicy tomato pork ribs). The flavor was spot-on — intense, pure porcini and salty breaded baked bits atop the fresh ricotta. The issue here had to do with texture - it wasn't creamy, it was granular, and the top of the polenta had already formed a skin by the time it was set on the table. If you want an example of polenta done right, see: Cucina Urbana.

My favorite dish was up next: "piccante" pizza. They aren't kidding when they say it's spicy. For the first time I can remember, I did not add red pepper flakes (though they were offered, along with salt and oregano, which I did add). Even better than the pleasant burn was the source of the burn — a thinly sliced salami.

The last savory to hit the table was "cacio e pepe." Unlike the best version of this dish, which we tasted at Lupa in New York, the pepper here was finely ground and barely detectable, as it was dusted on top instead of coarsely ground and spread throughout. It was pleasant enough, but more in a "mac 'n' cheese" way than the simple but surprisingly exciting cacio e pepe of another time in another city. As for the pasta itself, it was excellent — housemade, not overcooked, and flavorful enough to stand on its own.

My dessert was the only thing I wouldn't share — the homemade gelato was among the best I've tasted. I had a bite of the vanilla-custard-filled roasted pine-nut tart, which was also delectable, but I let the others share that, mostly as an excuse to hoard my pistachio and chocolate scoops.

As there were many items (meats, cheeses, and so much

more) that we didn't get to sample on our first visit, David and I vowed to return soon for a deeper exploration of the flavors of Milan.

They say it has been 21 years coming. But the Mercado apartments are open, its supermarket is open, and now its first restaurant is open. Cocina Doña Tina sits on the corner of the food section of the Northgate Gonzalez supermarket (an L.A.-based chain) at 1950 Main Street.

It opened on a lucky day: 12/12/12. But I've just noticed it today. I stop in on my way down to the Barrio Logan trolley stop.

It has a good-looking patio in a plaza with fountains and trees, right under the bridge. Inside, it's kinda like an eatery you'd find in, say, Kmart until you get close up and personal with the food. Man! It goes on forever — steaming chafing dishes with everything from ceviche to chicharron to pork stews. Just how rich the Mexican food tradition is kinda hits you in the eye. But Diana helps me out in English when I stutter a little. I ask for an al pastor taco (pork) on a corn tortilla. Costs \$1.99, \$2.15 with tax. Take it to a huge condiment display and lad up with chopped onions, cilantro, couple of salsas, and take it out to eat.

Hey, this terrazza is cool. You'd never know it had been an open field beside Chuey's, the bar-eatery that was a landmark in this area for decades.

And the al pastor taco? Hot, deeply rich in flavor. I have it down in five minutes. Not quicker, because the flavors are so strong, you can't hurry it. Man, this is good. May be competition for Las Cuatro Milpas, a block away.

And with the whole, like, encyclopedia of Mexican food waiting to be tasted in there, I'm coming back.



stopped by for a weekend dinner to garner some first impressions.

At first glance, it looked fabulous in there. The big, open, warehousey thing has been done to absolute death, but Gang Kitchen's decor is sufficiently warm and smart that it doesn't feel like eating in an airport hangar. True, there's lots of black stone employed, ostensibly in an attempt at edginess, but the end result is that it just looks good in there. It's hip and cool but still a restaurant, not a thinly veiled club.

With an obvious amount of ambition behind the scenes, I infer that Gang Kitchen thinks itself more high concept than it really is. An almost patronizing attempt by the staff to "explain"

I give props, however, for including flavors *other* than Japanese in an upscale, Asianfusion joint.

As things go, the food wasn't as "inspired" as they'd have you believe. Fried spring rolls (\$8) were filled with an indistinguishable mix of peanuts and chicken. Their saving grace was the use of Chinese hot mustard in the sweet and spicy dipping sauce. Feared by cooks and diners alike, hot mustard can be bomb when used correctly.

Spicy tuna (\$9) might have been pilfered from the sushi rolls at ABC Sushi 123, or wherever. The crispy rice cakes had a cool texture, albeit a touch gummy in the middle, and the small allotment of fresh wasabi (the same stuff I've been keeping an eye out for) increased my opinion of the dish slightly. Overall, the verdict was that both apps were somewhat pedestrian, but also tasty.

Main dishes included pad thai (twice!), panang curry, fried whole fish, and what looked like a version of Korean *bibimbap* with shrimp and mushrooms. If you're getting meat, entrée prices are \$20 and up. C'est la vie. At least they're big. I ordered some roast duck, cooked siu mei style, served with some excellent scallion pancakes, sake-infused fruit, and a very salty, astoundingly savory vinegar sauce. It was a great dish, maybe a tad salty, but big enough to share (especially with an order of fried rice on the side) and fun to eat. It's hard to say whether Gang's duck is 250 percent better than the same thing from a hole-in-thewall Chinese BBQ, and that's the rub for Gang Kitchen. Asking me to drop \$100 on dinner and drinks for two is risky business without truly delighting me at least once or twice during the meal. If the cuisine lived up to the ambiance, Gang could be a favorite place.

Shkoffing pizza Chicago style

I will shamelessly admit that every time I go to the Little Italy Mercato, I snag a sample of Berkeley Pizza. They are there every Saturday morning, selling take-and-bake pies and giving out bites to taste. There's always a line, and they usually sell out fairly quickly.

They also have a dinein shop on Island Avenue, between Fifth and Sixth, a tiny, cozy place where you can grab a slice and a beer or go whole hog and order a custom pizza. A quick caveat: each whole pizza is made to order, and they are thick, so it takes about an hour to put together and bake. Better to call ahead.

They also have a pretty darn good special — two slices and a drink for \$8, or a beer for \$10, dine-in only.

I like ordering slices of Chicago pizza rather than a whole pie because I think it tastes better that way. Sort of like when a roast chicken sits and rests for awhile, the flavors seem to blend a bit. Also, it's quicker, meaning I burn my mouth less often on screaming hot cheese because I'm too hungry to wait another second.

Today, I went with a pepperoni and a spinach mushroom, their signature pie, while John got sausage and pesto garlic. There's a small but good selection of beer on tap to choose from

Berkeley's Chicago deep dish gets its thickness from fillings,

sauce, and cheese, rather than a fluffy, bready crust. It leans a bit in the pastry crust direction instead, crispy and buttery. Sliced mozzarella is layered directly on the crust, then the toppings, more cheese, and finally the sauce and a shower of parmesan. Occasionally the order changes slightly; like most places, they put the pepperoni on top of the sauce so that it crisps and browns. A deviation I'm fully in favor of, because who doesn't love it when the

Nose to the phos at Pho Xpress

The thing about the Vietnamese soup-meal pho is, the more you slurp it down, the better it gets. The more concentrated, the more flavorful.

That's my tragedy tonight. In a rush. Ten minutes before the trolley. Won't have time to parlay this pho into its full pho-tential...

Of course, that's why I came here. Vietnamese places are always *muy rápido* when it comes to food; plus, these guys have a name to live up to, right?

This is Pho Xpress, 1125 Sixth Avenue, downtown, 619-9333.

It's in the part of town when the biz community has half an hour for lunch and they've gotta be outta here. So I guess they're used to folks like me.

I come in about eight at night. Still quite a few people in here (they close at nine). All seem to be heads down, nose into phos. I was going to have a banh-mi, the Vietnamese-French sandwich.

But at the last minute I crack and ask the lady for a pho (#18, the house's own Xpress Combination, \$6.75 for the small, which I get; the large is \$7.50) and a #12 sandwich, the pork (\$4), to take home to Carla.

Phong Bach brings my pho out within a couple of minutes, steaming.

Plus the side plate of a branch of real mint leaves (I guess, or is it Thai basil?), lime, and bean sprouts.

So I get some red Sriracha sauce, and then some dark brown, sweet oyster sauce, stir them into the little bowl you get, then rip off the mint leaves.

So, spoon in left hand, chopsticks in right, I have at it. Couple of spoon slurps, the chop-

Thing I like is, here, it's okay to hurry, leaning into your dish is okay, slurping is positively admired.

Turns out Phong is from 30 klicks south of Saigon. Says his name means "white wind." Oh, yeah. Phong, as in "phoon," as in ty-phoon (mighty wind). Says the dish was originally called "pho bac," soup of the north. But that adding the raw veggies is a southern thing.

I eat, talk, admire the Vietnamese art on the walls.

And then — oops! Time's up. Trolley and Carla call: gotta go. All that soup! Final slurp, pick up sandwich, make private oath to come back and do this properly.

PS: Carla gives in to my drooling back at the ranch. Flavor of her banh mi: nice grilled pork flavor, made more tart by bits of pickled daikon, and sweeter by the carrot sticks, plus cucumber, onion, and cilantro. Love it. Even though it's a mix of east and west, there's something distinctively Vietnamese about the taste.

But really, my heart goes back to that soup-meal that's good for breakfast, lunch, or, in my case, dinner on the run.

Ocean Beach minidonuts

I was minding my own business, waltzing through the Ocean Beach Farmers' Market (Wednesdays from 4–7 on Newport Avenue) in a vain

search for a guy who sells photo journals, when the unmistakable scent of fresh donuts wafted my way.

Could it be? Yes! It was! Freshly fried, miniature donuts for sale at the market; 15 of them for \$5. A successful halfdecade

It was 2008, but I remember it clearly, sharing a table with young restaurateur Arturo Kassel and discussing the origins of the name for his farm-to-table

Whisknladle (1044 Wall Street, La Jolla). He explained it was the name of a New York supper society and how he wanted the same brand of thought-provoking cuisine and inviting foodie atmosphere at his then brandnew eatery. He was so into the supper-club thing that, when I mentioned to him I was cobbling together my own group of experimental gastronomes, he asked if he could join.

My supper club wouldn't become a reality until 2010. By then, Kassel was too busy running — not one, but *two* highly patronized restaurants, so he couldn't participate. Whisknladle, originally greeted by critics and other industry folks with a moniker-inspired question mark, was drawing exclamation points from patrons who made the fast fave successful enough to breed a spin-off, the sortafast casual, dine-in or take-out Prepkitchen.

The Prepkitchen concept has since spread from a tiny nook in the Jewel to larger locations in Del Mar and Little Italy. Over the span of that growth, WNL has remained in the upper echelon among other San Diego eateries. Today, Kassel shares local resto mogul status with the likes of Tafazoli, Stanton, Malarkey, Brennan, Borkum, and Blair. Only the habitually prolific likes of the Cohns look down on him.

Five years, it seems, is a good time to take a step back and appreciate the steady rise from the foot of the mountain. In doing so, Kassel held a special family-style anniversary dinner at Whisknladle on February 8.

vocalist alongside the talented dancers and singers who populate San Diego's thriving burlesque/cabaret scene.

"It can get a little off-color, but no one ever gets fully naked," says Patrone. Once a month, he and his burlesque den mother, Lola Demure,

playing for casinos, weddings, and corporate gigs. Now he's discovering the rewards of singing as a bebop jazz

host a Sunday-night revue at Jimmy Love's downtown.

"In burlesque, the main focal point is striptease,"

> explains Demure. "With cabaret, its more like a Broadway show, where the emphasis is on singing, dancing, and comedy."

The pair use both cabaret and burlesque at Jimmy Love's. Patrone provides the live band. Lola provides the girls.

"Most burlesque performers dance to canned music," says Patrone. "I want to bring back the essence of burlesque, where you dance to a live band. I want to bring back the authenticity."

Demure, a former ballet dancer, says there is a thriving underground burlesque scene in San Diego. "You have Hell

on Heels and Drop Dead Dames. There's also Keyhole Cabaret."

Patrone explains the difference: "If they come up onstage and wear a Victorian corset and sing, that's cabaret. If they take off the corset, then it's burlesque."

Though Patrone entertains at the La Valencia Hotel in La Jolla 6-9 p.m. every Friday and at Jimmy Love's every Sunday from 8 to midnight, he says he moved to Nevada over a year ago.

"I live in Stateline, Nevada, near South Lake Tahoe. I like the Nevada political climate better. I don't like what's happening in California.

"There are an awful lot of taxes and regulations in California. If you book talent in California, you have to pay for a \$50,000 bond just to get a license...."

Patrone says he still plays his weekend gigs in San Diego because it helps him get wedding and corporate gigs. "But I am considering making a complete move out of San Diego. If it rains or if the temperature falls below 55 degrees, you got crickets. The streets are empty except for the tourists."

Is San Diego bait? "It is no secret that San Diego is a military target," writes vox/guitarist Bobby Bray of skronkymath-lounge duo Innerds (members of Sleeping People,

the Locust, Holy Molar).

Bray cites a handful of reasons for this, including the headquarters of General Atomics (the company behind the

"At this point the American collective consciousness has acclimated to postapocalyptic imagery. It has pretty much come to a point where the term 'postapocalyptic' no longer requires a hyphen. So begins the pre-postapocalyptic genre."

As a social experiment and exploration of pre-postapocalypticism, Innerds will be

"This show is the first in a series that aims to reexamine our physical place in the world. Depending on the strength of a nuclear detonation in San Diego, certain areas on the outskirts of the city would survive, such as Jamul. For this reason, the unlikely location of the Greek Sombrero was chosen as the venue for this show — perhaps the only place to see a local show in the future!"

The free show on Saturday, February 23, features the face-melting polyrhythms and falsetto yawps of Innerds, no-wave post-punk hijinks at the behest of Batwings, and schizophrenic avant-doom jazz passages by California Bleeding.

Funeral ganja. "Players Inc. started in Boston, when all the touring musicians would get home from their main gigs," says Slightly Stoopid trumpeter/keyboardist Christofer "C-Money" Welter of his current side band. "It was a chance for the musicians who often back singer-songwriters to open up musically and keep our chops sharp while off the road. The music is open, but with the form of dub, hip-hop, and R&B in a sexy, mature, deep-thinking kind of way."

C-Money's main band, O.B. ska-punks Slightly Stoopid, played their first paid gig at Soma in 1994 and were signed to Sublime singer Bradley Nowell's Skunk Records label the following year, while founders Miles Doughty and Kyle McDonald were still attending Point Loma High School. C-Money was added to the roster in 2006, having met the band near the end of his eight-year run with Bostonbased John Brown's Body and relocating to Ocean Beach, which he still calls home.

"Being in Stoopid took me to a whole other level. We've played Australia, Japan, Guam, Amsterdam, Portugal, Denmark, the U.K., Germany, Holland...we even sold out Red Rocks [in Colorado]." Their *Top of the World* album, released last August, took them to number 13 on the Billboard Top 200 chart, as well





Robbin moved to KCBQ in 1971 and became program director there in 1973. He is lauded as San Diego's most successful rock-radio figure — San Diego's current top-rated station, KSON, has a 6.0 rating; Robbin's 1973 KCBO once ruled local airwaves with a 13.4, dominated by his rapid-fire delivery and upbeat tunes.

Robbin's first radio gig was as a 14-year-old intern in 1958 at WCCO, Minneapolis. "They still had live-music shows and they would play an occasional 78 RPM record." He launched a backyard pirate-radio station in 1960 in high school. His first commercial radio gig was 1963, where he spun Top 40 hits from seven-inch 45 RPM records at a station in Redwing, Minnesota. After an Armed Forces Radio Vietnam war stint in Saigon, where he played the hits (think Good

Morning, Vietnam), Robbin returned to the U.S. and climbed the radio food chain to rock station KGB in the summer of '69.

As a programmer, Robbin broke his share of hits: "There

was 'Wedding Bell Blues' and 'Proud Mary,' by Ike and Tina Turner. Then there is the one I never talk about: Marie Osmond's 'Paper Roses,' which went

Brother Robbin back on the air on to reach number five on Billboard's Top 100."

'Gooood morning, San Diego!"

And at KCBQ, Robbin witnessed music history: "My boss accidentally played the flip side of Rod Stewart's 'Reason to Believe.' It was 'Maggie May.' We played

it every hour for two days straight.... Because of KCBQ, 'Maggie May' went on to become the second biggest single of 1971."

After stints in other cities, Robbin came back to the

> local airwayes in 1992, to the now-defunct oldies station KBEST-95. He left the airwaves in 2001 and started voice-tracking his DJ shifts via digital download to other markets.

When he realized that oldies radio was ignor-

ing certain hits from the '50s and '60s, Robbin launched his own internet oldies station, richbroradio.com, from his Ocean Beach home in 2007. "We'll play 60 to 70 Beatles hits and 30 to 40 Beach Boys hits you just won't hear on the

radio.... So, there I was, living the good life in Ocean Beach," Robbin tells the Reader, "with the website and my old cars, and along came the Walrus with an offer I couldn't refuse."

Whether Robbin gets to play more Seeds and Standells and less Eagles and Michael Jackson remains to be seen. But he and everyone else in terrestrial radio still must compete with Pandora and SiriusXM.

"Radio adds personality and a level of in-your-face excitement that you just can't get from Pandora. It sure is a hell of a lot more interesting than listening to one song after another on your iPod."

Does anybody remember Sparks? The brothers Mael launched that band in Los

Angeles during the early 1970s, and while I don't think they ever had what could be described as a big following, the memory lingers. They made strange electronica and disco and rock with lyrics that were intelligent, funny, and vaguely disturbing. It was hard to know exactly what to make of Sparks, but by the end of a day, their songs had some dancefloor whump to them.

I'm reminded of Sparks whenever I listen to Mouse on Mars: same comedy, cliché-bashing, and approach to the making of disco-ish songs that feel as if they are sucking a listener down through an aural tube and into a weird new space. That Mouse on Mars can do that better than their predecessors has got to be due in part to the extraordinary advances in technology made during the 20 years following Sparks. Otherwise, that's pretty much all that separates the bands: two decades and a continent, give or take.

Ron and Russell Mael bear no resemblance to each other but are indeed brothers. Jan St. Werner and Andi Toma, from Germany, are not brothers but claimed once to

have been born on the same day in the same hospital, Like Sparks, the Deutsch laptop artists seem to have an eccentric sexual fixation. Russell Sparks dressed glam crossover and literally sang in a woman's falsetto; Mouse on Mars' first disc is titled Vulvaland and the video put little mouths in place of women's naughty bits. But Sparks could lock into a rocking groove, and I keep waiting for MOM to do the same. Instead, they come with the cascades of chirps and burps set to a machine beat. Nothing resolves



in this music, which becoms a major part of the setup for their elaborate video comedies. Minus the images, the humor may be lost on the club crowd. We'll see.





A synth player who leaves a popular Aussie band, St Helens, to explore the possibilities of himself with his machines? Sounds like a fairly risky setup. But the short-lived indie band's exsonawriter/singer/ guitarist/keyboardist has crafted a sophisticated string of sounds on the album first put out by Sensory Projects — and now released by Hardly Art, which apparently thinks enough of Jarrod Quarrell. aka Lost Animal, to do so without any

bonus material, let alone a suggestion that he change his tongue-twisting birth name.

Ex Tropical deftly transposes and layers acoustic piano with synthetic sounds; weaving a just-gripping-enough

tapestry with bass, percussion, and Quarrell's salt-on-the-wound tenor vocals. The cumulative effect is surprisingly transporting. Quarrell delves deep into relationships and situations old and new (including his youthful time in Papua New Guinea), armed with inventive lyrics and passionate outbursts that hit their targets — our psyches — in an atmosphere that initially presents as low-key musings. Quarrell's inherently eccentric expressiveness recalls John Cale, Kevin Ayers, Robert Wyatt, and Nick Drake. The heat? Only Tom Verlaine (and Television's first album), Richard Hell, and Julee Cruise seem to have shared a similar passage. Together, those elements add up to an album that might be reissued in perpetuity.







When it comes to holidays, few lead to such controversy as Valentine's Day.

"Not to be too gender-specific, but with the Pucker Up, I will be trying to get men out of the box they're in when it comes to Valentine's Day," she tells me. "While the day is seen as a holiday for women, it really is a shared holiday."

On the surface, the Pucker Up seems like yet another "pink drink" — although Bruyneel describes it more accurately as "dark pink to reddish." But, she hastens to add, it's got something for everyone. And, as its name promises, Bruyneel assures me that the drink does afford some practice time with the lips, as the ingredients set the pucker-factor on "high" with an appealing balance between fresh flavor and alcoholic power.

"The first thing you'll taste will be the fresh lemon juice in the drink, so you get that pucker," she says, "which will be followed by the subtle taste of the raspberry and the peach mixed together. There's also the vodka coming in at this point, too. It's well balanced, so you're going to be left with a fresh, refreshing taste of fruit and pucker."



Courageous shoes "What good is freedom if you can't do nothing with it?"

he Gem of the Ocean was a slave ship. It's also a piece of paper Aunt Ester folds to look like one. The captain was such a "mean man," such a "selfish man," when the boat got into trouble, instead of going down with it, he snuck away on a lifeboat. Not only that, he

reversed nature: "He took all the water and left the crew to die. But they survived. They followed the law of the sea. Life is above all... so live!'

Only one American playwright could have told this story — August Wilson — and only near the end of his life, when the call for a final summation nags the mind as much as trivial memories. Shakespeare may not have considered The Tempest his last play, but his wise observations feel gleaned from a lifetime of experience. Also Billy Budd, where Herman Melville puts the letter and spirit of the law on trial. And whoever filled Ecclesiastes with sagacity was certainly no pup.

Though he wrote it near the end of his life, Gem of the Ocean (2004) is the first play in August Wilson's "Pittsburgh Cycle." He wrote one per decade from 1904 to 1997. All take place in Pittsburgh's Hill District. In the last of the cycle, Radio Golf (which Wilson was working on when he died in 2005), the Hill has become "blighted," and Harmond Wilks wants to redevelop it. He learns to respect the run-down, "human eyesore" of a house at 1839 Wylie Avenue, where the legendary Aunt Ester held her mystical sway.

The idealistic Harmond is a far cry from his grandfather, Caesar Wilks. As often happens with

> Wilson's characters, the name tells all. To Caesar, a local constable in Gem, the laws of the land are black and white, especially for blacks.

He's such a negative force, so mythically cruel, that if he wanted, like the captain of the boat, he could make water flow overboard.

Caesar's the opposite of Aunt Ester. She isn't the Aunt Esther of Sanford and Son (though Wilson may be picking up resonances). Aunt Ester's biography defies scientific laws as much as virgin birth. By her count, she's 285 years old. She came from Africa on a slave ship in 1619. She lost everything in transit and, through a spiritual transformation, discovered "it." She reinvented herself and the world around her, even renamed the stars. Along with being the history of African Americans, Ester has a gift for "washing souls" and shepherding people toward their true identity.

Citizen Barlow among them. He came north looking for opportunity. Like so many other African Americans at the turn of the 19th Century, he

finds that "hard times" are just as abundant on the Mason side of the line. A job at the mill put him in debt even before he started work. Many of Wilson's characters are so alienated, they can have luck, even love, and not know it. Citizen Barlow feels "unfinished," not "right with himself," in search of stable ground.


"It's hard to be a citizen," says Solly Two Kings, referring to life for blacks in the north and to young Barlow. "What good is freedom if you can't do nothing with it?" *Gem* answers this question with a tapestry of possibilities, each harkening back to Aunt Ester's reinvention on the boat — and discovering the law of the sea.

Cygnet Theatre's production honors the play's epic scope and amazing language but could take the "air" out of the spaces between speeches and pick up the pace. If anything, the cast's a mite too reverent for Wilson's irreverent look at official American history.

Andrew Hull's set — almost ancient wooden stairs and furniture — subtly reinforces one of Wilson's themes. Eli (a stately Grandison Phelps III) wants to build a wall around the house to "keep Caesar on the other side." But he can't, as the set demonstrates: tall empty gulfs separate the "walls" onstage, making 1839 Wylie Avenue a porous sanctuary.

Antonio "TJ" Johnson does full justice to Solly Two Kings, a larger-than-life battler for freedom (and one of Wilson's most trenchant commentators). On paper, Caesar Wilks is as rigid as the law he enforces. Mujahid Abdul-Rashid accepts the one-note challenge and plays it to the hilt. Ron Choularton, as expected, does first-rate work as Selig, the traveling peddler. Brenda Phillips is capable as Aunt Ester but could probe her mystical depths a bit more.

Gem of the Ocean is about searching for identities, freedom, racism (from without and within), and life for African Americans in 1904 Pittsburgh. It's also a changing of the guard. From afar, Citizen Barlow and "Black Mary" Wilks are unlikely candidates to fill the courageous shoes of Aunt

Ester and Solly Two Kings. As played by Laurence Brown and Melva Graham, both begin unmoored: Citizen needing his soul scrubbed clean for a crime he may not have committed; Black Mary (her name suggests "Black Madonna," apocryphal daughter of Jesus and Mary Magdalene) labors almost like a slave. Brown and Graham make impressive transformations: he from a magical trip to the City of Bones; she from deep within. Each develops, in the words of William Cullen Bryant, an "unfaltering trust," in themselves and the law of the sea. ■

Shadow world

MOVIES

n the interest of objectivity, I suppose I should start out by saying that it's difficult for me to be objective about John Dies at the End. It hits too many buttons for me to just look down and assess from any sort of critical Olympus. But I can, at least, tell you what those buttons are. That should help.

First: the feeling. When Ti West's The

House of the Devil came out in 2009, critics praised its throwback quality, the way it evoked the slow-burn scariness of certain '80s horror pics. John Dies at the End has a similarly glorious '80s vibe, involving as it does a portal to another dimension, goofy humor grafted onto crawling horror, and lovingly rendered critters that are far scarier than most CGI nasties.

Second, the framework: good old-fashioned Art Bell-style supernatural weirdness. Curiosities, usually no more than shrugged at - magic tricks, odd coincidences — that somehow add up to a shadow world that, as one character puts it, is "like the country-western radio station out there, even if we don't listen to it." A shadow world that is breaking through and must be contained before it blots out the light.

Third: the plot, which could have been taken from one of the better episodes of *The X-Files*. It turns out there's this drug, a sentient black goo, that will allow you to step outside the normal bounds of time and space and also to see the real horror that most people miss. (Actually, "allows" is the wrong word; "forces" is better.) Now that you know the truth, what are you going to do about it? There's no use pretending it didn't happen — we're all gonna face the mystery at the edge of existence someday.

This is not a perfect film; there's a plot hole at the center of things that's bigger than any interdimensional portal, and the bad-guy monologue near the end is well-nigh interminable. But, it is a delightful film, full of winsome performances (Glynn Turman's "old-school Catholic" police detective plays things just straight enough against lead Chase Williamson's controlled freakout). You know, if you're into that sort of thing.

INTERVIEW WITH JOHN DIES № AT THE END DIRECTOR DON COSCARELLI

Don Coscarelli first terrified audiences in 1976 with a flying sphere in Phantasm. Since then he has directed only ten films, and four of them have the word "phantasm" in their title.

It's not all horror for the director, as evidenced by his 2002 cult comedy Bubba Ho-Tep, a film that posits Elvis and JFK as patients in the same nursing home waging battle against

> an Egyptian mummy. Coscarelli's latest satire, John Dies at the

End, opens this week at Landmark's Hillcrest Cinemas. There's a lot more of the interview on The Big Screen, including talk of a *Phantasm 5* in the

Scott Marks: Do you remember the first time a movie scared you?

Don Coscarelli: I think I was afraid of Godzilla, but not so much. I'll tell you a movie that terrified me when I was in fifth grade. It's a very obscure movie with Hans Conried in it. Have you ever seen The Twonky?

SM: About the evil TV set?

DC: Hans Conried was chased and terrorized by a walking television. As a kid it scared the hell out of me, but now that I've revisited it, the effects are pretty cheesy. As an adult [and lapsed Catholic], The Exorcist scared me big time.

SM: John Dies at the End is based on a novel by Richard Wong. What was it about a sense-heightening drug that chooses its junkies called Soy Sauce that appealed to your sensibilities?

DC: I love the freaky concept that the drug had a mind of its own. Then the fact that it would allow you to see things without necessarily controlling them and to pierce reality by taking the pharmaceuticals. There are a lot of interesting ideas there. In some respects it harkens back to classic literature. I don't know that this movie is that far apart from *Alice* in Wonderland.

SM: Both Chase Williamson and Rob Mayes are relative newcomers to feature films. They are your Bill and Ted or Harold and Kumar. Where did you find them, and what was it about the pair that told you they'd have the comic chemistry needed to pull it off?

DC: It's a constantly evolving process. When I cast them, it was all hope; I had seen glimmers of auditions that showed me that the movie might really work. To get them to give fully featured performances that carried the whole thing...I didn't know. It was a day-by-day thing. Being a director, you can't create performances. You can certainly assist them but those actors have to have

something. Rob Mayes has this goofy sweetness about him when he delivers his lines that makes you smile and laugh at the same time. I could never as a director create that. The greatest breakthrough in the film and the greatest joy for me as a director was to have them in the film.

Roger Moore will no doubt show up and do for Oscar what he did for Bond: sleepwalk through the proceedings.

Sean Connery once professed to not knowing the names of the seven Bond flicks he appeared in, yet even he agreed to attend.

It's Pierce Brosnan, a tailor-made 007 if ever there was one. After his fourth appearance as the dapper spy, the producers chose not to re-sign him, making Brosnan the first Bond asked to leave the franchise.

Brosnan has the looks, but not the material. According to IMDB, "Brosnan's last three Bond films were the only ones in the series to not make more than five times their cost." Die Another Day is as bad a Bond picture as any you're likely to find. Brosnan's finest performance as the private eye is in the greatest unofficial Bond film ever made, John Boorman's The Tailor of Panama.

Brosnan has nothing but high praise for his fellow Bonds, with the exception of 007 one-shot George Lazenby, of whom he said, "George is just an angry, old, pissed-off guy. He was never an actor but some pissedoff Aussie who doesn't know how to show his feminine side. I met him, and he's got that kind of brittle edge

56 Up — The seventh installment in what could very well be television's first reality show. In 1964, Paul Almond began film ing a group of fourteen seven-year-old British schoolkids. The directorial reins were later handed to Michael Apted, who has since gone back at regular sevenyear intervals to document the group's growth. Inspired by Truffaut's fictional Antoine Doinel cycle that began in 1959 with The 400 Blows, the Up series offers viewers an exploration of the power of cinema as a tool to document and record human growth. (The filmmaker's original intention was "to get a glimpse of England in the year 2000.") If you have been with the program from the outset, it makes for highly compulsive viewing. 56 Up finds our diverse group of 13 participants —

Charles has been missing in action since 21 Up — well ensconced in middle age Two of the subjects are actually upset that their participation in the show hasn't led to a recording or publishing contracts. Those new to the series may want to pay a visit to Kensington Video and play a little catch-up. 2012. — S.M.

Beautiful Creatures — As the sun fades on the Twilight series, Hollywood sets its sights on another stretch of successful teen Harlequin Romances. Gatlin, South Carolina is the type of place people can leave only after they die. A group of "casters" (don't call them witches) transform the town and an otherwise handsomely shot horror film into a snuggly rom-com with enough stereotypical rednecks and Christian-bashing to alienate both sides of the argument. You thought the Twilight films were dopey? If Jeremy Irons is such an omnipotent warlock, how is it that he can't detect a strange boy in his daughter's bedroom? As the love interests, newcomers Alice Englert (Jane Campion's daughter) and Andy Griffith clone Alden Ehrenreich take turns dispensing expository dialogue. Instead of a one-sheet, theater auditoriums should post orange, diamond-shaped highway signs that read: "WARNING: FRANCHISE UNDER CONSTRUC-TION." Richard LaGravenese positioned the actors and hollered "Action!" With Emma Thompson and Viola Davis. 2013

Bullet to the Head — A bullet rips through the heart of two studio logos, announcing the return of Walter Hill to the genre that brought him fame, the action comedy. Sylvester Stallone and Sung Kang perform a nifty reversal on the characters Nick Nolte and Eddie Murphy played in Hill's 48 Hrs. With a Kevlar toupée and tanned bark that resembles wax burbling in a double-boiler, Sly hasn't had a role this meaty in decades: his "dead inside" narration is one of the film's highlights. Hill's regular DP, Lloyd Ahern, is back onboard and Alessandro Camon's screenplay reads like a greatest hits compilation of the director's preoccupations. It's been a decade since Hill stepped behind a camera and his style — particularly the MTV flash frames – could have withstood some modification. As enjoyable as it it to watch Stallone

kick the crap out of anything that gets in his way, the last half-hour drags on a bit, laying bare the script's graphic novel origins. Still, you're not likely to find a more enjoyable action picture this year, and the presence of any Walter Hill film is just cause for a trip to the multiplex. With Sarah Shahi, Jason Momoa (this year's Channing Tatum), and an abundance of comeuppance for Christian Slater haters. 2013. — S.M.

Django Unchained — Quentin Tarantino fails to do for slave owners what he did for Nazis in this, his long-awaited western (southern?) follow-up to the epic war comedy Inglourious Basterds. Oscar-winner Christoph Waltz returns to the Tarantino fold as Dr. King, a German dentist-cum-bounty hunter hot on the trail of a pair of nefarious outlaws. Once again, the connivingly charismatic Waltz is well mannered to the point of achieving a near-Oliver Hardy sense of nirvana. He also offers a crash course in mentorship to uppity slave Jamie Foxx, eager to save his wife from ruthless plantation lord, Leonardo DiCaprio. For its first third, Django Unchained plays like an agreeable cross between Blazing Saddles and Mandingo. (There is a hilarious bit about proper eyehole placement in KKK cowls.) Once they reach Leo's Candyland, however, the film becomes talky and set-bound, and the third act is little more than an excuse for bloodletting. Still, politically speaking, there's more truth told here about money and its ability to buy miscegenation than anything on display in *Lincoln*. Worth seeing, but not a good enough romp to justify its 165-minute running time. With Kerry Washington, Don Johnson, Franco Nero, and Samuel L. Jackson as the spitting image of cotton-haired Woody Strode in Ford's The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance. — S.M.

Gangster Squad — Gangster Squad may lack brains and heart, but it's got guts. You get to see 'em right at the outset, when a Chicago crook who dares to cross power-mad Los Angeles gangster Mickey Cohen (a guttural Sean Penn) gets ripped in half by a couple of sedans. (Then again, you get to see brains, too - but that's not until later on.) So yeah, there's plenty of violence. And Ryan Gosling is handsome, and Emma Stone is old-fashionedly pretty. And Los Angeles circa 1949 looks great. Beyond that, this tale of a good cop in a crooked town who tries to clean things up by forgetting about the law and treating American gangsters like an enemy army is a casserole made from tired leftovers. Blend up The Untouchables, Dick Tracy, and Mulholland Falls, drain off the moral intrigue, sprinkle with bits of soul-searching, reheat, and serve. With Josh Brolin, Nick Nolte, Robert Patrick. 2013. — M.L.

Hansel & Gretel: Witch Hunters —

The only honest one in the cast of this fractured fairy tale is Famke Janssen. When asked why she took the role of the witch, the actress acknowledged that she had a mortgage to pay off. Director Tommy Wirkola, who knew full well how to wrangle Nazi-zombies in *Dead Snow*, can't muster more than the background atmospherics and practical effects needed to give the stupidity a stage on which to play out. Jeremy Renner and Gemma Arterton star as the fabled Teutonic twins. (He's 42, she's 27.) Their impoverished upbringing at the hands of a witch finds them snacking on candy-coated walls,

not lead paint chips. Instead of waging war against diabetes, the pair mature and confront anything that flies on a broomstick. It's more grim than Grimm; the stench of Comic-Con filled the theater the moment the image hit the screen. D.W. Harper's plotless script even comes equipped with its own built-in fan boy (Thomas Mann) who follows our heroes around with scrapbook in tow. Will Ferrell produced, which should account for the film's adventitious comedic touches. (Pictures of missing children are slapped on milk bottles.) H sat on the shelf for a year while the studios waited for Renner's star to rise. The best that can to be said of mannequin Arterton's performance is the costumes fit and she can take a good punch. 2013. — S.M.

A Haunted House — Upon moving into the title abode, Damon Wayans purchases a video camera and promises girlfriend Essence Atkins that he's going to "film everything: Christmas, New Year's, vagina." One of the first images Wayans's camcorder captures is the imprint of Atkins's rear tire just moments after it ran over his pooch's head. A most imaginative sight gag soon cleans the air. Wayans reimagines Paranormal Activity godhead Orin Peli's shape-shifting, sheetfluffing specter as his galpal's blanketballooning nocturnal flutter-blasts. The cast of hedonistic house guests includes a gay psychic, a determined couple of swingers, a "Mandingo party" that puts Tarantino's to shame, and a surprisingly flat Cedric the Entertainer in the role made famous by Max Von Sydow. Worth seeing for Essence Atkins, who alternates between comic underplaying and demonic flamboyance with the greatest of ease. The Wayans family withdrew from the Scary Movie franchise after the second installment. With SM5 just around the corner, series co-creator Wayans decided to beat the Weinsteins to the draw with a Paranormal parody of his own. His scheme paid off. SM5, set to open last concurrently, pushed back its release date from January to April. Certainly not for everyone, but I must confess to chuckling at a few of the film's baser moments. Identity Thief — Don't blame the Apatow connection for this one. Director Seth Gordon (Four Christmases, Horrible Bosses) steals a few chapters from the John Hughes playbook as he tries in vain to transform Melissa McCarthy into this generation's John Candy. Playing an alcoholic sociopath in a Bozo fright wig, she uses the money she electronically pilfers from middle-class schmucks to buy strangers rounds of drinks in hope of winning a friend. One of her victims (Jason Bateman) gets wise to the con and - for some reason known only to the screenwriter — must cart "Slobbin' Hood" cross-country to help prove to his boss that he's not a crook. The problem is, John Candy was a dandy comedian, not Chris Farley with a vagina. Per usual, the shameless third act pathos (and the obligatory sow's ear makeover) prove funnier than any of the stuff passing for comedy that precedes it. 2013. — S.M.

The Last Stand — Weary screen warrior Arnold Schwarzenegger returns to Hollywood in a film about a cop who got old and left LA for an Arizona border town. But this being Arnold, trouble finds him. And this being Arizona, it's Mexican trouble (though — ha-ha — this time it's a Mexican who wants to get out, not in). And this being the Wild West, it's best addressed through superior firepower. It's hard to say what gets sold harder

here: gun ownership or Chevrolet. (The bad guy drives a very fancy Corvette, and a gun-toting grandma gets a cheerful cameo.) The story works best when it sticks to mayhem, humor, or - particularly in the case of a sadly underused Johnny Knoxville — a mixture of both. The trademark Schwarzenegger quips are traded in for something less jokey and more situational, and director Kim Ji-woon (I Saw the Devil; The Good, the Bad, the Weird) knows his way around an action sequence. You will not find many surprises, except perhaps Peter Stormare doing his best Robert Duvall. You may find some delights. With Forest Whitaker, Luis Guzman, and an unmussable Jaimie Alexander. 2013. - M.L.

Les Misérables — Sincere story of answered prayers, mostly those of one Jean Valjean (Hugh Jackman), an ex-con who tastes mercy and tries to break free from his criminal past (he stole a loaf of bread). But the reformed man is pursued by Javert (Russell Crowe), a lawman who does not believe reform is possible. Jackman and Crowe are both game, but when almost every line is sung, the voice must do the work, and neither is quite up to the task. Crowe lacks the requisite menace, and Jackman can't quite manage the controlled vocal acrobatics. So it's up to Sacha Baron Cohen and Helena Bonham Carter to steal the show as a couple of naughty, bawdy scallywags. (The story is set in France, but the culture it portrays smells English, except there are more nuns about.) They have the show stolen from them by Eddie Redmayne's Marius, a young nobleman with a head full of populist ideals and a heart full of love for Valjean's adopted daughter. (In general, the kids carry the day here.) Director Tom Hooper (The King's Speech) builds a rich world, full of muck and majesty, but can't resist prolonged closeups come solo time. And solo time comes often. With Anne Hathaway, Amanda Seyfried. 2012. — M.L.

Knife Fight — A winning political strategist (Rob Lowe) is taken by a sudden case of the guilts in this lumpy, predictable comedy. This is Guttentag's first full-fledged foray into narrative filmmaking, and someone should have told the documentarian never to bring made-for-cable direction to a multiplex. (You can't debate laughter.) Of the remaining entries, only the stop-motion "Head Over Heels" feels like an exercise of imagination as well as technique as it tells the story of an old couple of who have found opposite centers of gravity. "Adam and Dog" (yes, that Adam) is beautiful but aimless, while "Fresh Guacamole' and the Bill-Peetish "Paperman" play like warm-up exercises for larger projects. 

Safe Haven — On the run from the law, big-city gal Julianne Hough finds refuge in the arms of small-town widower Josh Duhamel. The Sparks factory appears to have had a work stoppage. Why else would the popular novelist resort to openly lying to his minions in order to advance the clichés? 

Side Effects — Back in 1989, indie film director Steven Soderbergh broke onto the scene with his first film: Sex, Lies, and Videotape, a seamy, sticky drama about sex, lies, and videotape. Here in 2013, he is giving us what he says will be his last film: a seamy, sticky drama about sex, lies, and digital images. Also, psych meds, because the modern anxiety over how a pill can or cannot change a persona is ripe for exploitation. Soderbergh does a fine job of intermingling the smooth, clinical world of Dr. Jonathan Banks (Jude Law) with the jagged, messy life of depressed young wife Emily Taylor (Rooney Mara). And for a while, he does an even better job of keeping the viewer uncertain about who, if anybody, should be rooted for. Some dodgy casting decisions — Law never manages real desperation — do little to get in the way of the story's gleefully nasty mechanics, 2013. — M.L.

Silver Linings Playbook — David O. Russell needs to leave Philadelphia almost as much as John Woo needs to stay in Hong Kong. For his follow-up to The Fighter, Russell once again takes the low road in search of truth and beauty amidst a group of boorish louts with personalities akin to the cast of Here Comes Honey Boo Boo. A former schoolteacher (Bradley Cooper) - undiagnosed bipolar, borderline delusional, violent, and fresh out of the state mental institution — decides to move back home with his parents (Jacki Weaver and Robert De Niro, both phoning it in). Not since Do the Right Thing have so many characters in one movie spoken with the same identical voice. Close your eyes during one of the film's numerous screaming matches and you won't be able to distinguish between Cooper and Jennifer Lawrence. To add injury to the insults, Russell's camera covers the action either in constipated close-up, as a "walk and talk" (traveling shots of characters delivering dialog as they stroll), or both. Even a musical number is photographed from the waist up. The third-act combination of Dancing with the Stars and repugnant behavior on the part of violent football fans should make this a bit hit with Monday night TV viewers. Apart from Ms. Lawrence's electrifying turn as the tough-talking dame who plans on mending Cooper's heart by putting him

back in touch with his ex, this couldn't have ended soon enough for me. With incessant jabbering from Chris Tucker, a welcome, albeit brief appearance by Julia Stiles, and brilliant background work by Paul Herman. 2012. — S.M.

Skyfall — James Bond lumbers back to his roots. A Bond film is supposed to deliver mayhem and eye candy in exotic locales; Skyfall offers memorable set pieces in Shanghai, Scotland, and an abandoned island factory compound. A Bond film needs gadgets; Skyfall knowingly gives us a personalized Walther and a radio transmitter. (Honoring the brand, but not indulging it.) A Bond film should feature a menacing villain who's also just a touch daffy; Javier Bardem has more fun than anybody else onscreen as a roque agent with a mommy complex and a comehither leer. But most of all, a Bond film needs a proper Englishman who can do his bit for crown and country while dazzling the ladies and wearing a tuxedo like it's a second skin. Here and there, Daniel Craig manages the trick, but too often, he comes off like a canny street tough, a musclebound Steve McQueen with a posh accent. Along the way, his boss M notes that "orphans always make the best agents," but that shouldn't mean they get to skip out on charm school. (Craig's delivery on

the trademark Bond banter labors harder than the seams on his trousers, which is saying something.) But it's not all his fault: he's not the one who blends Mother and the Mother Country in a story that takes much too long to say much too little beyond, "Spies — like the one in this oldtimey franchise - are still relevant!" With Judi Dench, Ralph Fiennes. 2012. — M.L.

Stand Up Guys — For 28 years, two loyal friends serve a concurrent prison sentence: Val (Al Pacino), behind bars for refusing to finger an associate, and Doc (Christopher Walken), on the outside, waiting to perform the hit when his old partner is released. You might think there isn't much to this gangsters-get-old fable that hasn't already been depicted in similar outings (Going in Style, Tough Guys). But then, you've never seen it played by Pacino, Walken, and Alan Arkin. As with most films of this type, Stand Up Guys is a love story between men, but for a change, it's not simply a boys' club. Lucy Punch, Julianna Margulies, Vanessa Ferlito, and newcomer Addison Timlin all add credence and consequence to our trio's decisions. Director Fisher Stevens's greatest sin is keeping the camera in too close, but with this trio of wizened, aged-in-elegance mugs, one can't really fault him. 2012.

Texas Chainsaw — With six Chainsaw films to reflect upon, one would hope that director John Luessenhop (Takers), eager to decorate the Leatherface family tree with crisp teen body parts, would have at least unearthed a fresh meat hook or two upon which to hang his sequel. The story picks up where Tobe Hooper's 1974 original ends: a lynch mob torches the farm leaving Leath' and his newborn cousin, Heather as the only Sawyers to survive the opening flashback. Ingenuity begins and ends with the jokey premise — Leatherface's cousin grows up to be a hottie (Alexandra Daddario) - as the screenwriters leave every stone unturned in their dogged effort to inflict more of the same. Whatever images your mind can arouse of Leatherface running roughshod over a packed carnival are bound to be more satisfying (and creative) than what's splattered across the screen. Luessenhop appears to have given his leading lady one expert piece of direction: keep your nipples covered and belly-button exposed at all times. With the exception of a few screen-piercing lunges, the 3D effects are negligible. With Richard Riehle, Chainsaw veteran Bill Moseley, Scott Eastwood, and Tania Raymonde as the designated skank. 2013. - S.M.

now-married couple Judd Apatow first introduced us to in Knocked Up. (Katherine Heigl, who told Vanity Fair that the original "paints the women as shrews, as humorless and uptight, and it paints the men as lovable, goofy, fun-loving guys" was not invited back for the sequel.) Rudd has a dream of introducing a new generation to Graham Parker, while Mann is desperately clinging to 39. The largely improvised marital skit-com marks Apatow's fourth jaunt in the director's chair; at least this time, he has the good sense to feature Albert Brooks in a meaty supporting role as Rudd's dependent father. There are the usual amount of gross-out jokes one associates with the Apatow factory, along with the usual featherweight observational material — he sneaks cupcakes, she hides cigarettes - sprinkled with topical references. And what would a Viagra opener be without a subsequent stream of penis jokes? As much as I enjoy watching Albert on screen, in this case, his comedic timing would have been put to better use if he'd been hired as an editorial consultant to whittle away a halfhour. Warm Bodies — A date movie for every guy whose girlfriend forced him to watch sparkly vampires fall mopily in love. R (Nicholas Hoult) is a brain-munching zombie who just wants to connect. Julie (Teresa Palmer) is a spunky blonde from the other side of the massive concrete wall her dad built to keep corpses like R away from decent people like his daughter. (Dad just hates corpses — one of them ate his wife.) Gosh, what could "R" stand for? Don't come looking for a consistent zombie aesthetic, and don't pay too much attention to the cutesy voiceover of R's interior monologue. (Dude's a teenage zombie, what do you expect?) Do come for the thoughtful sweetness and the Shakespeare allusions ("If you shoot us, do we not bleed?"). Zombie Best Bro Rob Corddry and John "Bulldog" Malkovich make the most of their supporting roles. 2013. — M.L.

Zero Dark Thirty — Spoiler alert: it ends with the bad guy getting killed. More hurt from Kathryn Bigelow in this docudrama (read: hand-held) account of the hunt for Usama Bin Laden. From its conception to execution, the American government's "Yippee ki yay!" murder of Bin Laden had Hollywood blockbuster written all over it. For its first 30 minutes, Zero Dark Thirty plays like torture porn; Jigsaw waterboards Jihadists in Saw VIII. Jessica Chastain stars as Maya, a prototypical Bigelow heroine, initially reserved but quick to grow an icy set of balls when needed to cut it in a man's world. She is a "Hawksian" professional of the highest order: the real-life person upon whom the character is based spent 12 years — her entire career with the CIA - doggedly pursuing the mission at hand. The Agency accuses the film of taking "significant artistic license, while portraying itself as being historically accurate" in its depiction of the government-sanctioned waterboarding of a messenger as a means of obtaining the vital clue needed to pinpoint the exact location of Bin Laden. Is Bigelow juggling the facts or exposing truths many hold to be self-evident? When it comes to establishing and maintaining tension, there wasn't a better American genre picture released this year. Refrain from viewing it as historical record and you won't leave disappointed. 2012. — S.M.





New CFO, same old story Sweetwater Union hiree has alleged "personnel problems" and an unaccredited degree

In a February 1 phone call, Sweetwater Union High School District spokesperson Manny Rubio acknowledged that the district has hired Dr. Albert Alt as their new CFO. Rubio said Alt was selected after "a couple rounds of interviews."

Alt comes to Sweetwater from the Yuba Community College District, where he began serving as director of human resources in 2003 and was promoted to vice chancellor of administrative services in 2009. He reportedly had a troubled tenure in both capacities.

According to a May 2012 article on *Appeal-Democrat.com*, Alt's position was abruptly eliminated. A chancellor for the district, Doug Houston, told the *Appeal-Democrat* that the move was partially due to reorganization but "there were also personnel issues in play" that prevented him from commenting further.

Like too many California school districts, the Yuba district borrowed costly money

under their \$190-million construction measure J. According to a September *Daily Democrat* piece, the district borrowed \$4.6 million as a capital appreciation bond in April 2011. The loan will eventually cost the taxpayers \$54.2 million.

Some of the district's trustees said they were not fully apprised of the terms of the loan. Trustee Jim Kennedy told the *Daily Democrat* that he "blamed two former district executives, Chancellor Nicki Harrington and ousted Vice Chancellor Al Alt, for not keeping trustees informed on what they were voting for."

In 2008, while acting as director of human resources, Alt had a problem as a result of taking his doctorate from Madison University — an unaccredited university. Says a 2008 article in *Inside Higher Ed*: "Among Al Alt's duties at Yuba College is making sure the degrees are legitimate — at the point of hire, or when professors or others at the California community college file the paperwork to qualify for higher pay based on earning a new degree....

"[I]n a sign of how widespread the problem may be with unaccredited degrees, Alt last year had to tell his bosses to lower his own salary: a doctorate he earned after he started work at Yuba — and for which he was paid extra — apparently came from an unaccredited institution, he said."

The shirtless man, who appeared to be in his 20s, seemed to be distressed and crying. The window he jumped from was in a halfway house, according to the man's substanceabuse counselor, who showed up across the street to talk to the officers. She told authorities that the man had called her and said he was drunk. She yelled the man's name and told him everything would be okay.

A couple of neighbors said that they knew there was a halfway house on Cypress Hills Drive, where the incident took place. Other neighbors said they had no idea this kind of establishment was right next to their homes and expressed concern about it in relation to recent crimes in the area.







LEAD STORY

 Update: Gary Medrow, 68, has periodically surfaced in News of the Weird since 1991 for his unique behavior of using a false identity to persuade Milwaukee-area strangers over the phone to lift other strangers off the ground — behavior for which he has occasionally been jailed and ordered to psychiatric care. After a recent period of calm, Medrow slipped in November and was charged with impersonating a photojournalist to convince two Cedarburg (Wis.) High School students to hoist each other on their shoulders (and four similar incidents were under investigation). At an earlier hearing, Medrow said that his "addiction" helps him to relieve tension and anxiety.

Awesome

 Jason Schall, 38, who has retired as a financial planner and now devotes his energy to fishing, had a spectacular week in September when he won a catch-and-release tournament in Charleston, S.C., came within 11/2 inches of a world record on another catch, and was notified of recently setting two Nevada state records for largest fish caught. Schall's coup de grace, he told the Charleston Post and Courier, came a few days later when he caught a redfish while sitting on his living room sofa in Daniel Island, S.C., watching a Clemson football game with a pal. He had run a line with bait through a crack in the door, through his yard, into the lake behind his home.

- College student Courtney Malloy, 22, was rescued in November after getting stuck at about 1 a.m. trying to cut between two buildings in Providence, R.I. The space between City Sports and FedEx Kinko's was 8 to 9 inches, said firefighters, who found Malloy horizontal and about 2 feet off the ground and "unable" to explain how she got there.

- Leslie Newton, 68, was pulled over by Florida Highway Patrol officers near St. Augustine in December while driving erratically. He also had a portion of a traffic sign embedded in his skull after colliding with it.

- Helen Springthorpe, 58, with only three months on the job as the bell-ringer at St. Nicholas Church in Bathampton, England, was knocked unconscious in November when she became entangled in the bells' ropes and was jerked to-and-fro around the belfry, her head smashing against a wall. Fire and ambulance crews eventually lowered her about 20 feet to the

The Continuing Crisis

- Floyd Johnson pleaded guilty to attempted murder in an odd scene in a New York City courtroom in November. Johnson has only one leg, and had been charged with stabbing a fellow homeless shelter resident who has no legs. Johnson's public-defender lawyer (who caught the case at random) has only one leg, also. Johnson said he was taking the plea in part because of excruciating leg pain — in the leg he doesn't have ("phantom leg" syndrome), and Johnson's lawyer said he suffers from the same thing. (The lawyer subsequently filed to withdraw the guilty plea because the pain had clouded his client's judgment.)

- Amber Roberts, 30, a resident of the unit for the criminally insane at Eastern State Hospital in Spokane, Wash., informed officials in November that she "[just now] murdered someone, but you're going to have to find him." As staff members searched the facility, Roberts offered to help by shouting "hot," "cold," "you're getting warmer," and so forth. Roberts yelled "Hot!" as they closed in on the room containing the body of a 56-year-old patient that Roberts then admitted strangling. (However, a few days later in court, she pleaded not guilty.)

Tunisia's Ministry for Women and Family Af-

fairs demanded in October that the government prosecute the publisher of the children's magazine Qaws Quzah ("Rainbow"), aimed at ages 5 to 15, for an article in the then-current issue on how to construct a gasoline bomb (aka the "Molotov cocktail" in America). The country has been rocked by the same kind of upheaval experienced in other Arab countries, except less so since its longtime president stepped down rather quickly in January 2011.

Suspicions Confirmed

- Researchers from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston found recently in tests that tenth-grade students who play video games (especially shooting and sports games) regularly score just as high in robotic surgery dexterity as resident doctors. The lead researcher said that surgery simulations (for example, suturing) have built-in unpredictability, for training purposes, but since complex video games are laden with unpredictability, players logging at least two hours a day with the joystick may even slightly outperform the residents.


