#### Bad sidewalks = lawsuits?

City slapped with another brokensidewalk suit

San Diego/San Ysidro — Why should the City of San Diego pay for some expensive sidewalk study when it can just rely on the increasing number of lawsuits filed by pedestrians injured on San Diego's fractured sidewalks?

On June 5, Lily Mata filed suit against the city and San Diego Unified School District after getting tripped up on an uneven sidewalk in front of Kit Carson Elementary in Linda Vista in March of this year.

In her lawsuit, Mata claims that she encountered a sidewalk littered with debris, a "non-trivial ledge, height differential separating parts of the curbing."

"Plaintiff was injured in her health, strength, and activities, and sustained serious personal injury, and as a legal result of those injuries, incurred in the past and will incur in the future the expense of medical, nursing, physical therapy, dental, convalescent, hospice, and other treatment and care for those injuries..."

San Diego's sidewalks have been a divisive topic as of late. The issue has gained media attention in the form of a photo blog from *Voice of San Diego*. The *Reader* covered the issue of dangerous sidewalk conditions in San Ysidro back in 2011.

In that article, 64-year-old amputee Juan Mariscal lamented the difficulty he had using a wheelchair to get from place to place in his community:

"It's disappointing," he says. "[The city] puts money where the rich live, but they forget about the poor communities like San Ysidro. Not all of us can afford electric wheelchairs. And that's what you need to get around here because of the sidewalks. I can't stay at home and do nothing. I'm not ashamed of being in the chair. I'm ashamed that my wife has to push me. It makes me look weak."

As of late, councilmember Mark Kersey has lobbied the mayor to appropriate \$1 million for a citywide sidewalk study.

#### In-N-Out doubt...

Neighbors say restaurant zoning change impacts quality of life

 $\overline{0}$  Clairemont — Who wouldn't like to have an  $\overline{C}$  In-N-Out drive-thru just steps from their front doors? Residents of Pacific Bluffs condominitums, that's who.

A group of Clairemont residents is fighting a proposal from Regency Centers, the new owner of the 186,000-square-foot Balboa Mesa Shopping Center, to change the zoning designation on a portion of their lot

so they can build an In-N-Out restaurant.

The problem: the restaurant would be 173 feet away from Pacific Bluffs, a 268-unit condominium complex at the corner of Balboa and Genesee avenues. If approved, dozens of homeowners would be within earshot of a drive-thru that would stay open until 1:30 in the morning.

"We would love to see development take place and new businesses come to Balboa Mesa," says Michael Puente, a Pacific Bluffs resident. "We are just against this one thing: Changes to the protective zoning, that would allow a busy drive-thru, open until 1:30 in the morning just about 100 feet from our bedrooms."

The residents have started a website to fight changing the zones. Puente estimates that over 300 people have signed a petition

to keep the current zone intact.

The developer hasn't been sitting idly while opposition from the community continues to mount. Earlier this year, Regency Centers hired local land-use lobbyist firm Southwest Strategies to get support for the project in the community and at city hall. According to economic disclosures filed with the city clerk, the firm was quick to begin lobbying on behalf of Regency Centers.

They argued that the area where the restaurant would go was smack dab in the "core" of Clairemont and the zoning change would fall in line with the community plan.

Judging by the votes taken by the local planning group, the strategy from Southwest Strategies seems to be working.

In November, members of the Clairemont Community Planning Group voted against making any changes to the zoning. Four months later, the planning group flipped, voting 9-to-2 in favor of amending the zoning designation.

Chris Wahl, president of Southwest Strategies, says Regency Centers is and has been more than willing to work with nearby residents.

#### Not so darling

Back in 1995, when Benjamin Farber was 74, he met Donna Lee Darling,

who was 43 years old then. "We met in the workout gym," Farber said, ber. He said she spoke of

and the two "seemed to get along well."

Farber and Darling tried living together in 1998. Farber invested \$15,000 as a down payment for a house in Vista, and the two lived as roommates there. But it didn't work out. Farber abandoned the house to Darling, and he moved to a trailer park in nearby Oceanside that same year.

At the trailer park on Blue Sky Lane, Farber enjoyed the warm sun and ocean breezes. He lived there 14 years and kept in touch with Darling over that time.

In 2011, Darling tried to demand \$5000 from him, Farber said. He told her, "I said, I can't do that."

"Money has always been her big problem," said Far-

ber. He said she spoke of money troubles "quite a few times." Darling told him her credit cards were maxed out and that she had car trouble. Farber said, "I've given her probably about \$3000." He figured it was a gift, because "I knew she didn't have the money to pay me back." Darling tried to make her living teaching yoga classes, but as time passed, her class shrank to just a few people, according to Farber.

It was mid-summer of 2012 that Darling most recently asked him for money, as Farber remembers it. He was compassionate and cared about her, and he even put Darling in his will. "Because I was good-hearted.... She was in my will. We've taken her off. Since this incident."





#### **A Scary Summer**

Farber's first scare the summer of 2012 happened in July. Even though he was 92, Farber always enjoyed his daily walk, often inside the local Walmart. When Farber realized that he was too tired for his normal walks, he went to see a doctor. He was diagnosed with prostate cancer.

After his cancer treatments, Farber went home to recover but soon decided to move to a place with "assisted-care living" in nearby Carlsbad. Farber began to pack up all the things he had gathered during the 14 years spent at his home in Oceanside and put

them into cardboard boxes.

At this time, between hospital and moving to the assisted-living facility, Farber got a temporary livein care-giver, a petite Filipina woman named Marlene. "She kept an eye on me. She did some cooking." Marlene stayed with him 24 hours a day.

Marlene was placed with Farber through the Nightingale Home Care agency. That agency required her to keep constant notes; for example, whenever Farber had a guest or took a nap, Marlene made a note of it. She had been there about ten days before Darling came over.

#### A pillow over his face

"She showed up on her own," said Farber. "I never called her and asked for her help packing." It was Thursday, August 16, 2012, when Darling came over. "It was in the afternoon." Sixtyyear-old Darling offered to help. "She came in with

said he usually just drank from the can. "She urged me to drink out of a glass, which I didn't want to."

Farber said he didn't want to finish the drink because it didn't taste good. He also claimed he could see a "residue" in the cup.

Farber said that within a few minutes he felt weak, so he went to lie down in his bedroom.

"Pretty soon Donna came in," Farber said. "She kneeled down by my bed." Farber said Darling kept repeat-

After three to five minutes, Marlene came into the room and asked what was going on. "She got off me then." Farber said the attack stopped abruptly. "Donna had been straddling me, holding me down."

Farber said his arms had been held down but then he was able to sit up and he reached down beside his bed. "I took my house slipper, slapped her across the head with it. She said, 'Ouch!"

Marlene said that when she came into the room she could see Darling leaning over the elderly man, and then "they split .... And I saw a pillow was in his face. And I saw a sweater was in his mouth."

When she looked at Farber, "He was shaking, he was scared."

Police later collected a gray sweatshirt that had fresh blood on it, which the Marlene said had been stuffed into Farber's mouth. "Mr. Farber removed the sweater from his mouth. I saw it," Marlene insisted at a court hearing in January

Darling was arrested the same day as the incident. She soon bailed out and remains at liberty until she goes on trial for attempted murder and elder abuse. She's pleaded not guilty to both charges. Her next court date is June 25.■

First Darling sat and chatted with Farber. It was a hot afternoon, and after awhile Darling asked Farber if he wanted a cool drink, he remembered later. "It was unusual for her to offer me a drink that way."

Darling got a can of Glucerna from the supply Farber kept in his fridge. "It was my favorite drink, a kind of chocolate drink." She decanted the chocolate drink into a cup. Farber

ing, "'No pain, no pain." He didn't know why she kept saying that. Then suddenly a pillow was slapped onto his face "with great force." Farber said he couldn't get his breath. "I tried to get my head out where I could breathe. And I was trying to yell for help. I yelled for help, a couple of times."

Farber said he tried offering his attacker money when he could get a breath to speak. "I was just trying to save myself."



#### Booze, sweets, and Vargas It

took only a short time for Democrat Juan Vargas to conduct his first San Diego fundraiser as a

newly elected Democratic congressman. On March 22, according to an invitation widely circulated here and on Capitol Hill, Vargas threw his "first annual" "Margaritas, Mariachis & Mulligans" fundraiser, teeing off at Mission Valley's Riverwalk golf course. The per-person tab for golf and booze was listed as \$1250. Attendees who went to only the reception paid \$250. According to a recent filing with the Federal Election Commission, contributions booked by the campaign that week included \$1750 from Mark Arabo, the head of the Neighborhood Market Association, a group representing convenience markets and liquor-store proprietors. In April the



Other notable San Diego Vargas backers included developer William Ayyad (\$2000); real estate man Bernardo Diaz (\$800); Sunroad's Aaron Feldman, developer of that controversial over-height building near Montgomery Field (\$500); Fred Maass, the developer caught up in the scandal over so-called opposition research he commissioned against GOP ex-councilman and mayoral candidate Carl DeMaio (\$1000); and developer **Bruce Tabb** (\$2500). Political action committees also got in on the action, including the Employees of Northrup Grumman Corporation

PAC (\$2500); Experian PAC (\$1500); Humane Society Legislative Fund PAC (\$1000); and Ameripac, a PAC associated with Maryland Democratic congressman Steny H. Hoyer, second-ranking in the House Democratic leadership (\$2000).

A great deal of the other PAC cash collected by Vargas came from those associated with the

sugar industry. They included the American Crystal Sugar Company PAC (\$5000); American Sugar Cane League Political Action Committee

(\$1000); American Sugarbeet Growers Association PAC (\$1000); California Beet Growers Association LTD Political Committee (\$500); Great

> Lakes Sugarbeet Growers PAC (\$3000); Minn-Dak Farmers Cooperative Sugar PAC (\$1000); Snake River Sugar Co. Political Action Committee (\$1000); Southern Minnesota Beet Sugar Cooperative PAC (\$2000); and the Western Sugar Cooperative PAC (\$3000).

> It happens that the sugar producers have been battling against proposals to abolish price supports on the sweet stuff. Pouring hundreds of thousands of dollars into its battle, the sugar kings have so far been able to hang on to their subsidies; last week the Senate rejected the reform measure on a 55-45 vote.

> Vargas, who sits on the key House Agriculture Committee, wasn't alone in taking sugar cash. Roll

Call noted Monday, June 10, that the American Crystal Sugar Company reported spending \$1,004,117 on lobbying during the first quarter of 2013, about \$300,000 less than for all of last year. Lawmakers from big sugar-producing states, including liberal Democratic senator Al Franken of Minnesota, have fought off the would-be reform legislation. Senate passage of the farm bill was expected Monday, with the House taking up its final version soon.

Vargas used much of the cash he raised during the first three months of this year to pay down campaign debts. He made a \$25,000 payment to the Primacy Group, the political consulting outfit owned by Larry Remer, whose hard-hitting attacks last month against Democratic citycouncil candidate Dwayne Crenshaw, heavily backed by the Republican Lincoln Club, drew

editorial opprobrium from GOP developer **Douglas Manchester's** *U-T San* Diego. Remer worked for labor-backed Democrat Myrtle Cole, who won the Fourth District race





Several longstanding and well-known charitable agencies sponsored by the Archdiocese of Tijuana now find themselves overwhelmed by the increasing numbers of those living in "extreme poverty," the newspaper reported.

Instead of serving what has been the usual two meals a day, La Casa de los Pobres ("house of the poor") in Colonia Altamira now provides a single meal, beginning at 7 a.m. On average, more than 6000 people a week rely on Casa de los Pobres for the single meal they eat daily.

"Casa de los Pobres desperately needs your help!" says a notice posted on the charity's website. "The combination of the serious economic downturn and the horrific drugcartel violence afflicting Tijuana has created a steep decline in both donations and volunteers. Without Casa doing what it does, day after day after day, the very bad situation in Tijuana would become incomparably worse."

Across the city, reports El Sol, many of the poor are living out of cardboard boxes and begging for money on the streets. When times get particularly tough, they turn to one of the city's 105 Catholic parishes for help.

Some of the poor apparently aren't all that grateful. In some parishes in outlying areas, reports El Sol, the bells used to call the faithful to worship have been silenced by thieves: "They steal them so they can sell the metal for a little bit of money."

An announcement late last week from Banco de México suggests the growing plight of Tijuana's poor is not likely to reverse course anytime soon. For ten consecutive months, beginning in July 2012, the bank said in a monthly report that there has been a steady decline in the amount of money Mexicans living abroad have been sending home to their families.

#### Local artist installs new mural at Jaroco Market

On Wednesday, May 29, local artist Giancarlo Pia installed his first outdoor large-scale mural — on the north wall of Jaroco Market at the corner of 25th and B streets.

At approximately 17'5" wide by 7'5" tall, the piece is Pia's largest to date. Titled Golden Hill, the mural began as a small-scale collage Pia arranged and layered using an X-Acto knife before he had it enlarged. He united the images in hopes of conveying an urban warmth that would reflect the neighborhood he has lived in for three years.

The artist approached the owner of Jaroco Market, a mainstay of the community, to ask if he could use the wall (a popular spot for taggers) to install an art piece. The two collaborated on the plan.

The resulting artwork was enlarged and printed by reproHAUS on DPF 8000 vinyl film, which is made of PVC and used for outdoor applications such as billboards and automobile wraps. Like a giant sticker, the art was installed by adhering the material

to the wall and rolling from the top down, in sections.

Pia said he is pleased with the imperfect outcome: the textured plaster of the wall gives the work another dimension, and the visible edges show the process of creation.

A graffiti-proof coating protects the art, though Pia expresses his feeling that "not all graffiti art is bad." He sees his piece as a nod to other street and outdoor art in the community and cites Chicano Park as a source of inspiration.

#### Vans, trucks, trailers, campers graffitied

Early Monday morning, June 3, calls were made to the San Diego County Sheriff's Department to report graffiti painted on many vehicles and the sidewalk on the 400 block of Poinsettia Avenue in Vista.

According to Tom Dubose from the city, gradually, more high-profile taggers are being arrested as a result of investigative practices. He said before they start to paint over or remove graffiti, sheriff's deputies take photographs; the info is then put into a graffiti tracking and documentation system that identifies patterns of certain monikers.

have been suffering from what I refer to as Cause Fatigue, brought on by a barrage of missions mowing me down on the street, at the grocery store, or wherever I am via tweets, status updates, and emails.

As with most things that wear me down, my CF built up gradually. Back in December, I signed George Takei's petition on Change.org to "allow e-readers and other safe devices to be used at all times during flights." The "no electronics, even in airplane-mode" rule is stupid — everyone knows that reading from an e-book or playing Angry Birds is not going to crash the plane. I sneak-read from my devices during takeoffs and landings. I clicked the link to sign the petition because I fancied the idea of not having to hide my electronic dalliances.

Apparently, I must have overlooked a box that needed unchecking, because ever since I created an account (a necessary step before signing a petition), I've been receiving regular emails about other "campaigns for change."

There aren't enough hours in the day to properly research the facts surrounding every petition that pops up. After languishing in my inbox, I usually end up deleting most with barely a glance.

There are local petitions, like the one to urge Sprouts to rehire a disabled man they fired over what the petitioner claimed was a misunderstanding; and there are national ones, such as the one calling for the Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network to change its policies to save the life of a ten-year-old girl who will die within the week unless she's recognized as an

The only problem with all those petitions is that I only have a portion of the information I need to make an informed opinion. The petitioners count on people

like me to react emotionally to these outcries and only consider the complexities of the surrounding circumstances as an afterthought. But issues are rarely blackand-white. A brief search to find out more about the poor dying girl led me to this quote, attributed to an NYU bioethicist: "Acting under pressure from a media savvy family 'or the noisiest person in line' is bad policy.'

Pressure is needed for change, but that quote made me realize that I had been ready to grab a pitchfork and head to the hospital without knowing whether or not one girl's survival would mean a different person's demise. I didn't have all the facts — I had a heartrending plea from distraught parents and the sickening awareness creeping in that there are children who die every day because of bureaucracy or limitations in resources. How many of them might have lived had there been enough noise calling attention to their plight?

Causes are like nipples — everyone seems to have at least two. The countless entreaties that appear in my daily digital feed address all kinds of problems that need solving, such as abused elders, abandoned animals, towns razed by natural disasters, global warming, heart disease, homelessness, and every kind of cancer. There're also kids who need surgery to correct cleft lips, veterans who need help finding jobs, and natural habitats that must be preserved.

There aren't enough hours in the day to properly research the facts surrounding every petition that pops up. After languishing in my inbox, I usually end up deleting most with barely a glance. When I consciously think about wrongdoings and suffering, the empathy becomes overwhelming; apathy is my protective mechanism.

In the midst of this recent "care crisis," I turned to my father, who always seems to be caring about one thing or another, volunteering for this or marching to raise awareness for that. "I sometimes think if I try to maintain awareness of everything everyone wants me to be aware of that I'll just go insane," I said. "I'm tapped. My emotional resources are all allocated."

"You can care about everything," Dad said, "but you can't do something about everything." Regarding the situation with the girl who needs a lung in order to live, he said, "Whose heart wouldn't get ripped out thinking about that? The lady in charge of Health and Human Services, the one everyone's attacking because she's not making an emergency exception to the rules — you can look at this woman and say she's a horrible bitch, but she's stuck between a rock and a hard place."

"But if you care about it, doesn't it bother you to not help with it? I'm not talking about all the stuff you're already involved

with — Make-A-Wish or Special Delivery — I mean the things you know of, but that you choose, for whatever reason, to not do anything about," I said.

"When the tornado hit Oklahoma, you know, I have some time, maybe I could have gone over there to volunteer to help sort through rubble or whatever," Dad said. "But I sent \$100 to the Salvation Army instead. Whenever something terrible happens and I'm concerned about people as fellow Americans, or fellow people on Earth, I send money to a group I think will be able to help them. I'm not going to beat myself up for the ones I don't help. I don't disregard those things, but you'd burn yourself out if you tried to do something for everyone."

"But what about when people try to make you feel bad, like you should care more about something that's not real high on your list?"

"In my world, I do what I can, where I can," Dad said. "I'm comfortable with what I do and I feel like I'm participating. This may sound cheesy, but I shine my light and I share my love."

"No, it's not cheesy at all," I said, smiling to myself as I thought, Schmaltzy is the word you're looking for.

After ending the call, I stared out the window without seeing anything, as if I were focusing on the air itself. Maybe Cause Fatigue was just a symptom, and the underlying disease was the nagging sense that my protective mechanism had become the norm. That the thousands of needles poking at my heart had only served to thicken and harden it. **■** (@barbarellaf)

#### STRAIGHT FROM THE HIP BY MATTHEW ALICE

#### Heymatt

I have always wondered why some people who use American Sign Language speak words as they sign them, sometimes without making any actual sound. If sign language is intended for deaf people, what is the point in using speech?

— Kyle, CIty Heights

There's no single answer for this question, but I can shed some light on a few different parts of the problem for you and at least draw a partial conclusion. There are some people, usually members of the "hearing" community, for whom ASL is a second language. For them, the link between speech and sound is so deeply ingrained that it's hard to disassociate the two things and speak only with the hands. Effectively, they're translating words into signs as they say

them, much the same way as someone learning a second language has to formulate thoughts in his first language before translating them into the second. Fluency occurs when someone learns to think and process information in a new language, removing the intermediary step of silent translation. There's a whole lot of tricky, structural linguistics from Roman Jakobson, Ferdinand de Saussure, Roland Barthes (among others), but I'll spare you the college lecture.

Truly fluent ASL speakers involve the face and mouth in signing. "Mouth movements" and other non-manual signs are very different than "mouthed words," because they are not associated with verbal speech. They're more like punctuation marks, suffixes, prefixes, contractions, and all the subtle parts of speech that give nuance to conventional language. Deaf (and ably hearing) ASL speakers capable of fully expressing themselves via sign use much more than their hands. Facial expressions and gestural signifiers aren't limited to sign language by any means. Just watch someone with an expressive set of eyebrows talk. If you pay attention, you'll start to see linguistic patterns emerge in just about anything. Sign languages are still being studied and theorized over because, while they operate much like conventional languages, they aren't identical in every aspect. Those key differences get linguists all hot and bothered, sparking no end of saucy, academic debates.

#### Heymatt:

How come we always refer to "South Florida" when conventions for other states and places dictate the use of "southern?" I'm thinking of how you would say "Southern California" or "Southern Illinois." Even the South itself is referred to as the "Southern United States" when you use "south" adjectivally. "South Florida" is the only exception I can think of. What gives?

How come I have never heard of anyone with the last name of South? There are plenty of Wests and Norths. East is a bit more rare. It usually

serves as the foundation for a suffix: Clint

Eastwood, George Eastman, etc., Poor old South is barren in the name game.

Have you or your elves heard of anyone with the surname of South?

As far as South and Southern Florida are concerned, both terms are equally valid and nobody should hem and haw over your use of either. The *New York Times* is good enough to keep accurate records dating back to the middle of the 19th Century. Up until the 1960s, "South Florida" and "Southern Florida"

appeared with roughly equal frequency in the world's biggest newspaper, each one being used a couple of hundred times per year. From the 1960s until today, use of "Southern Florida" steadily drops off and the familiar "South Florida" gains an overwhelming majority. Why this idiosyncrasy got locked into speech around the middle of the 20th Century is anybody's guess. My theory is that the spread of television gave verbal communication an edge over the written word and formerly localized terms became more widespread following their use in mass media. Lots of other things are like this. After all, why "upstate New York?" One thing they say about Florida is that "the further north you go, the further south you are." What that means is that the northern part of the state is more socially in tune with the culture of the Southern United States. That is to say, you're more likely to see Confederate flags, sweet tea, and pronounced drawls in Tallahassee than

As far as people's names go, West is the only one of the cardinal directions to break into the top 1000 surnames in the United States during the past couple of U.S. censuses. It actually did well, almost cracking the top 100! North, South, and East aren't even on the list of the top 1000 as of the 2000 census. Would you believe Osborn, Bright, and Bolton all trump the directional names? I found census records from 1990 that ranked every single surname in the U.S. North is #1797, East is #2620, and South is the big loser at #2723...only slightly less common than Troutman. Ouch.

In case this all left you wondering, at the very bottom of the list, ringing in at #88799, is the least common surname (that appears with sufficient frequency as to be statistically significant) in the entire United States: Aalderink.


POST TITLE: Getting my FIX POST DATE: August 7, 2012

I drank a beer, standing in the doorway and getting the cool breath of wind from the street.

— Ernest Hemingway, The Sun Also Rises

After a week in Greece, I've decided that

my favorite Greek beer is "FIX." It's a fitting name, maybe too fitting. It kind of makes me feel self-conscious when I order it, as if I'm a borderline alcoholic who hasn't yet come to grips with my addiction. I can't avoid the word and its English meaning. Every time I drink it I see the big label



At the very least, drinking a beer called FIX is a reality check — like having to fill out the form in the doctor's office where you have to mark the box next to how many alcoholic drinks you consume in an average week. Well, imagine thinking about that doctor's form every time you order a drink! This beer might as well be called "fiend," "addict," or "the shakes." [Editor's note: There is in fact a Belgian strong ale branded Delirium Tremens.] I'm at the point where I'm tempted to copy my girlfriend and order red wine just because, psychologically speaking, it would be easier.

Usually, I have maybe a beer a day with dinner. Sometimes, I have two or three at a happy hour — sometimes more — but that's it. Now that I'm on vacation, I'm drinking about three or four a day, sometimes five — one or two during the day and a few more at night. Not a big deal, but I've been on vacation now for at least two weeks — arguably much longer. So, those five a day, sometimes six (multiplied by 14 days or more) are now

on the spectrum of alcoholism, right? I guess it depends on who you ask. Of course, "alcoholism" is a strong word, which is why I try to avoid using it. But if I consider that I've been drinking multiple beers every day and factor in that the beer I drink here is called "FIX," that I'm a writer, and I'm currently

reading Hemingway, then we've got a dangerous mix.

Consider this: I know all of five words in Greek — yassas ("hello"), efaristo ("thank you"), kalispera ("good afternoon"), parakalo ("you're welcome"), and FIX. Most of my Greek language exchanges are at walk-up bars and go

something like this:

"Yassas!" I say.

"Yassou," says the bartender, "kalispera." "FIX?" I say.

Then the bartender repeats FIX in the affirmative and pulls one — preferably a bottle — out of the fridge. He puts it on the counter and I imagine that he's the devil incarnate.

"Epharisto," I say.

"Parakalo," he tells me and smiles. The spikes in his hairstyle look like horns. I turn to the bearded, chubby, gray-haired man to my left. He's wearing Speedos and sipping a margarita. He looks a little like Socrates, so I imagine his margarita as hemlock. I walk away from the bar with my FIX, happy — having used every Greek word I know — yet feeling like an afflicted beer aficionado.

The other thing that's strange about drinking FIX is that it doesn't even sound Greek or sound like a beer that tastes good. It sounds more like the name of an industrial glue or a multipurpose cleanser. So I'm thinking I might start to drink Alpha or Mythos just because it sounds more Greek and doesn't make me feel like such a junkie. Though, the truth is, at the end of the day (which is literally right now), I'm not all that worried about my beer intake. If I was truly guilty or self-conscious about it, then I wouldn't be sitting here in front of my computer, drinking another FIX.



#### **Good times**



The Heat's Chris Andersen overcame 315,968,000-to-1 odds to play in this year's NBA Championship.

he most improbable player in the NBA Finals is Miami's forward/center/sixth man Chris Andersen. Improbable is an understatement. The man overcame 315,968,000 to 1 odds

Andersen, 35 next month, was born in Long Beach and moved to Iola, Texas, when he was a toddler. According to Wikipedia, Chris "... was the second of the three children of Danish corrections officer Claus Andersen and Linda Holubec, a Tennessee native who worked as a waitress.... In 1982, when Andersen was four, his family moved to Texas, using a loan from the Texas Veterans Land Board to purchase a tenacre plot in unincorporated Iola.... Claus left the family without even finishing the house they were building. The Andersens then lived off the land, with Linda working on low-end jobs and relying on the help of neighbors and Linda's brother.... During Andersen's middle-school years, he and his siblings were even sent to a group home in Dallas for three years."

So, Dad was not only a corrections officer, but a Danish corrections officer. One wonders, among correction officers, is there a special Danish subdivision? Or, did Dad, just off the boat from Denmark, make a quick recon into California, and, disgusted by what he saw, decide to become a peasant farmer in Iola, Texas?

But, this is only the beginning of strange. Andersen enrolled into Blinn College, a junior college with campuses in Brenham, Bryan, Schulenburg, and Sealy, Texas. Beloved by those who know Blinn College, but not necessarily a national brand.

Now we come upon Andersen's gifts: he's tall, 6 feet, 10 inches, plays basketball with great energy, is a great shot-blocker, and a great rebounder. Andersen dropped out of Blinn to await the 1999 NBA draft. And wait, wait, wait, he did. He wasn't aware you had to fill out NBA paperwork in order to be drafted.

So, he did exhibition games with a Texas semi-pro team, thence the Chinese Basketball League, then back to the States and the International Basketball League. He played for New Mexico Slam and Fargo-Moorhead Beez. Following year signed with the NBA Development League's Fayetteville Patriots. Played two games for them and then upgraded to the Denver Nuggets. It's November 2001.

There are 400 players, give or take, in the NBA. There are, roughly, 85 foreign players, leaving, roughly, 315 native-born players in the league. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the population of the United States, as of June 6, 2013, was 315,968,000. So, you have a one in a million chance of playing in the NBA just by being born here. But, coming into the NBA by way of Iola, Texas, Blinn College, Chinese Basketball League, IBL, NBA D-League, I'll set those odds at one in a billion.

But, Andersen made it. Salary for 2001-'02, his rookie NBA year, was \$288,000. Couple years later, \$600,000+, couple years after that, \$3,500,000. Big money, big fame, big love. Life is sweet.

In January 2006, Andersen tested positive for a banned substance. He was booted from the NBA for two years, which indicates the substance was not a performance-enhancing drug or marijuana, but something on the NBA's "Drugs of Abuse" list, which includes cocaine, heroin, morphine, LSD, and PCP, for openers.

Two years' banishment can be regarded as career-ending. But, Andersen came back. He was reinstated in March 2008 and signed with the New Orleans Hornets, only to be released after the season. Denver to the rescue. He played the 2008-'09 season for them, finished second in the league in shots he blocked per game, while averaging only 20 minutes of play. The Nuggets signed him to a five-year contract.

It's May of 2012. SB Nation headlines: "Chris 'Birdman' Andersen's Home Searched as Part of Child Pornography Investigation."

That's a show-stopper. And it certainly stopped the Denver Nuggets, which immediately excused Andersen, indefinitely, from all team-related activities. Indefinitely turned into forever.

Even now, a year after the search, Andersen has never been arrested, never been charged with any crime. And, even now, a year after the search, police have not closed the case. Two weeks ago a sheriff's office spokesman emailed journalist Michael Roberts: "The Douglas County Sheriff's Office Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) unit began investigating Andersen in February 2012 and executed a warrant on 05/10/12. The investigation has been ongoing and continues to be ongoing."

Denver dropped him, no other team was interested, Andersen is out of basketball. It's over.

Until last January. Miami, desperately needing help inside, signed Andersen to a ten-day contract. And another one. Then a contract for the rest of the season. Now, Andersen is on a team playing for the world championship and he's playing brilliantly.

Life is sweet. Again.

With an asking price of \$3,500,000, Milagro Farm Vineyards and Winery in Ramona qualifies as the most expensive property currently offered in

any of San Diego County's eastern communities. The property spans 110 acres, 20 of which are planted with 10,000 producing

grape vines of 11 different varieties.

In addition to the wine grapes, the estate also includes apple and

olive orchards, a citrus grove, pens for raising hogs, and an area for free-range chicken and turkeys that's also home to a handful of peacocks.

While there are several residential units on the property, the newest and largest, with just over 2400 square feet built in 2008, is likely more a vacation retreat than a full-time residence for the true elite. Referred to in listing materials as the "lake house," the threebedroom, three-bathroom home is well appointed, with vaulted exposedbeam ceilings, an open chef's kitchen with stone and butcher-block countertops, and a master bath suite with an antique-style claw-foot tub next to a separate oversized glass shower enclosure. 



Encinitas Bans Plastic Bags; Sets Sights on Plastic People

"Someone has to take a stand," said longtime Encinitas resident Sunshine Lollipop Rainbow. "Encinitas used to be a beautiful beach town. Then came the plastics. 

It didn't make sense: I had enough chlorine in the Kelly pool to make stingy eyes, but I was still getting algae on the steps. So, I called in Mark Larimer of Save Water Mobile Pool Filtration in Lakeside (619-328-9099; savewatersd.com).

"If you use chlorine tabs in your pool," explained Larimer, "you're continually adding more conditioner [cyneric acid]. It helps keep the chlorine from burning off. But once the conditioner gets over 100 parts per million, it starts to act as an umbrella for the chlorine molecule,

and it gets hard to keep the pool clean. Even with a high chlorine level, you can still get algae because the conditioner won't let it do its thing. And you can't get rid of conditioner un-

less you either drain the pool or use reverse osmosis." Larimer provides

"It's cheaper to drain a pool, fill it up with tap water, and then go down to the pool store and buy \$50 worth of chemicals to throw in it," granted Larimer. "Factoring in the cost of water, you'll be up and running for under \$300. But the \$200 more you pay for filtering is cheap insurance against any problems with your plaster. When you drain a pool, you're removing 200,000 to 300,000 pounds of water weight from the pool. The exposed plaster can blister or get eggshell cracks. There have even been cases where pools pop out of the ground, though that's more likely to happen somewhere like Santee, where the soil has a lot of expansive clay. Replastering a pool can cost from \$5000 to \$10,000.

Though some people do drain their pools and have no problems — it's just a gamble."

Larimer explained his process. "Before doing a job, I do a water analysis. If you don't need my services, I'll let you know. Your total dissolved solids may be high, but you may just need to upgrade to a better pool filter. I see lots of pools where the filter is undersized or just too old. The equipment I use is almost like a dialysis machine for the pool. We're stripping out the total dissolved solids: the calcium, the minerals, and the conditioner levels that have built up over time. The water level of the pool doesn't really change. We have a hose that's pulling water out for us to filter, then another hose putting it back in. We pull 40 gallons a minute. Of that, 10 gallons

are being dumped down the drain — full of conditioner and microbacteria and calcium — and 10 gallons are being added as make-up. Depending on your [dissolved solids levels, you'll lose 15 to 30 percent of your original water. The whole process takes eight to ten hours."

> Larimer recommends filtrations every two to five years for optimal pool longevity. He charges \$575 for filtration. "That includes a chemical reset when we're finished, making sure all the levels are correct — even salt, if it is a salt pool." And if you call for an appointment during the winter season, it's only \$475. Bruce Wettistein, co-owner of

Pool Service Technologies in Escondido (800-535-0778; poolservicetech.com), pointed to another advantage of filtration instead of draining. "You do save water, since you keep about 85 percent of your original water. But city water is going to have minerals in it, predominately calcium. That's what people worry about because it leaves a white line around the swimming pool."

Like Larimar, Wettistein uses reverse osmosis. "Once we pull the water out, it goes through a prefilter, a sand

filter, and a UV light. Then it hits the reverse osmosis membrane, where pretty much everything is removed. Even the makeup water we're putting in gets filtered. Nothing coming out of our rig contains any hardness or minerals." Of course, that means if you have a salt pool, "the salt is getting

filtered out and you'll need to add salt back into the pool."

Pool Service Technologies charges \$475 for pools up to 20,000 gallons, \$575 for pools up to 25,000 gallons, and \$675 for pools up to 30,000 gallons. "And we always run a sevenpoint water analysis both before and after the service. First, we make sure you need the service, and last, we let you know what you should do to get the pool chemicals up to their optimum levels."

# Del Mar Cat Fight

There was a notorious cat fight in San Diego County in the spring of 2012. It happened at the Del Mar Fairgrounds, but not during the annual cat show. The fight happened during a circus act.

"She had grabbed my hair and shirt pretty much at the same time, and was ripping at it," said soft-spoken Kallie Lamb Helwig. "At the time I had very long hair. It went past and below my waist, and my hair [hung] down

straight." Not anymore.

Helwig tried to save her beautiful hair. "I attempted to get her hands out of my hair. So I felt up my head through my hair and pulled [at] her hands. And I tried to pull her hands off, but I couldn't because she'd wrapped my hair multiple times around her hands. So then I followed her arm up to

her hair, and I tried pulling it down, and I repeated at least three times, 'Let go and I'll let go!' At the same time, there were so many people converged around us. Everybody was saying, 'Let go!' to both of us."

A witness said both women were bent over at the waist, clutching each other's hair. Then someone took hold of the other woman's shoulders and tried to pull her free. Helwig stumbled and fell to the ground.

"Unfortunately," she said,

"I don't think he knew that she had her hands wrapped in my hair."

The scuffle was brief, Helwig said. "From when she first struck until we were separated, I would say no

longer than 15 seconds. She ultimately let go, and I felt her release." Helwig was crouched over, down on the ground. Both women were on the ground.

Some of Helwig's hair had been pulled

out. There were scabs, later, where hair used to be. Security personnel took photographs of Helwig right after the fracas. In the photos, Helwig has her hair pulled up into a messy ponytail that spills down one side of her head. "The way she had wrapped her hands around my hair, it had matted, and I could not brush it out. And so I had to

put it up." It was a quick repair, using a hair tie that Helwig's mother had given her because she was going out on a date.

It was an unsightly incident during a date with a man she was trying to impress. Helwig had arranged the date herself. She bought tickets to the last performance of Cirque du Soleil in San Diego County. This was May 27, 2012. Helwig drove to pick up Gerald Torello, her date. They rented a hotel room near the Del Mar Fairgrounds before heading off to the show.

The scuffle left Helwig hurting. "I had a strain in my neck, and spasms in my neck and back. And headaches. And a contusion to the top of my head." Because of the bare patches where her hair had been ripped out, Helwig cut the rest of her hair short. "Yes, I had to cut my hair."

She admitted that she hit the other woman first, in the head. "I punched her." But Helwig had felt threatened. Then, "I struck her twice more." She admitted, "She never made any specific threat of bodily harm."

Helwig denied that, after the circus performance, she was waiting near the exit specifically to attack the other woman. "Well, I was looking for my mom. I was scanning for my mom. I had attempted to go find her, but I was waiting to exit."

Helwig didn't know where her mom was sitting during the show; they did not have seats together. "I told her I'd see her after the show. We hadn't made any specific plans on where we were going to meet."

Helwig didn't know where Torello was, either, during the slugging and hair-pulling and the tum-

ble to the ground.

After that day, Helwig said, she and Torello "stopped dating."

#### "Just leave"

After the other woman let go of Helwig's hair, someone told her to "Just leave, just get out of here." She did not see her date, nor her mom, "so I walked down the stairs." She was embarrassed that her shirt was torn, exposing her bra. "I tried to fix my brassiere."

She walked out into the dark parking lot. "They had shuttles, but I didn't take one because I was so

embarrassed [about] the way I looked."

Helwig decided to go to the car; she had the keys, but "Nobody was there. So I started returning to the fairgrounds — we were in the fairgrounds still — but [I started] back to the tent. And as I'm walking, I see sheriff's vehicles with their overheads on." Helwig's mom called her cell phone. "'Hey,' [my mom] said, 'the sheriffs [deputies] are on their way. They're going to want a statement from you.' I was already on my way back, so I told my mom, 'I'm on my way. I'll be there shortly."

That's when Helwig next saw Torello. She was coming out of the parking lot, walking toward the sheriff's vehicles. Torello looked concerned. "He said, 'What happened to you?' Then he asked me if I was okay because I looked disheveled."

#### Kallie Helwig explains

Helwig was 25 years old in February 2013, when she took the witness stand to explain herself. She'd been charged with battery, for hitting the other woman. There were other criminal charges, too.

Her own, friendly attorney asked, "Why did the fight begin?"

"It began because she approached me," Helwig said. "I felt threatened, and I felt that I had no other choice but to defend myself."

Prosecutor Tracy Prior said, "Nothing about this was a fight. It was an attack."

Helwig explained that it began when she bought tickets for the Cirque du Soleil show "as a gift" for her mother. "It was my mother's birthday." Helwig bought three tickets to the "Totem" performance. The total cost came to \$339.50.

She also invited her Torello to the show. They'd been dating about three weeks. They'd gone bowling and to the movies.

Helwig and Torello didn't sit with her mother. All the other seats in the area where her mom was sitting might have been taken, but Helwig wasn't sure about that.

That day, a Sunday, Helwig drove to pick up her date, then took him to the hotel, where they met up with Helwig's mom. They rented rooms, then Helwig drove to the fairgrounds.

Helwig said neither she nor Torello drank anything before the show. "He had one glass of champagne during the first act. I had one glass of champagne during intermission."

Torello bought a blue aluminum water bottle for his date as a souvenir. Helwig said she drank only water from the "very nice, expensive water bottle."

During the first half of the show, they were holding hands and kissing. "A

little. Closed-mouth kissing." She said it was not all kissing on the mouth. "A lot of it was on the forehead and the cheek." It wasn't "excessive."

At intermission, Torello went to the bar area and bought three glasses of champagne. It made Helwig "nervous," because her mom might be "disappointed or uncomfortable." Helwig is sensitive to drinking. "Both of my parents were alcoholics." She didn't tell Torello this because "Well, it was a date." He didn't need to know about her "family issues." She wanted everybody to "have a good time."

Helwig said, "I asked him if I could have one of the glasses of champagne, and he agreed. I didn't feel comfortable with him having three, so I figured I would take one of them."

Torello wanted to continue drinking in the bar area, but Helwig led him away to a bench. "He was concerned about how long it was going to take before the bar shut down." Helwig was afraid that Torello wanted to buy another drink, and she meant to distract his attention.

Helwig sat on a bench. Torello stood facing her. "I had my arm around his waist, trying to keep him facing me." She grabbed his belt buckle and his pockets. "Well, he had jeans on, so there were pockets where you could insert your hand. I inserted my fingers, not my entire hand." Helwig denied that she'd put her hands inside his pants or that anyone was staring at them.

But two witnesses claimed that Helwig "stuck her hands down the front of his pants."

Torello said something about getting another drink, maybe a shot, but the couple soon wandered off in another direction, away from the bar. "I mean, we weren't there for any longer than a minute-and-a-half to two minutes." She insisted that they did not leave the area because people were staring at them. "No, I left when the bar was closed.





seated in her row "staring at me prolonged." It made Helwig uncomfortable. "I could not figure out why she seemed, like, so intent on staring in my direction. Then she blurted out, you know, 'Get a room."

An attorney asked Helwig, "Why do you think she said to get a room?"

"I figured [it was] because she felt our kissing was inappropriate."

Helwig said she told the woman, "I wish I could just leave," to which the woman replied, "'I can make that happen.' At that point in time, I had not been facing her, and I turned to face her, and I said, 'Excuse me?' And she said, 'You heard me.' In an aggressive tone." The woman's demeanor was also "aggressive."

"It made me feel uncomfortable. I've never been in a situation where I've had to go back and forth with a stranger, and, honestly, I didn't even know what to say to something like that."

Helwig returned her attention to Torello. "I didn't want to ruin our date. So I told him, 'No, it's not you. I'm just not feeling very well.' And he put his arm around me, and I put my elbow on his lap, and I rested my head on my hand."

#### Her head in his lap?

A prosecutor wanted to know if Helwig's head was in Torello's lap.

"Define 'lap area," was



Helwig's quick retort. "In his lap? On his lap? My head was in my hand, my elbow was resting in his lap. That's my testimony."

Helwig demonstrated her position for the jury. "What happened is I had my elbow on his lap, and my head was resting on my hand in this fashion — like this. And I had my other hand on the armrest."

Helwig was charged with lewd acts in public, a serious criminal charge which could require her, if convicted, to register as a sex offender.

Witnesses said they saw Helwig perform a lewd act on her date. But according to Helwig and two defense attorneys, these people were imagining things.

"I had been eating popcorn," Helwig explained. While she rested her head on one hand, with her other hand she reached for the popcorn, which was "right below our feet." She'd stretch a hand down to grab the popcorn, then put it in her mouth. Sometimes she drank out of her metal water bottle. Helwig said she "never" had her



It was "maybe five minutes" later when Torello kissed the top of Helwig's head, and the man seated next to them turned and said, "Why don't you guys just leave?" Torello told the man, "Mind your own business."

Witnesses later said they heard Torello make a threat that included the word "kill," but Helwig refuted this.

All during this time, "there were two small children," seated in the row in front of Helwig and Torello. "During the first act, they had kept [facing] forward. I'm assuming that, because they are small children, their attention span wasn't able to last the entire length of the show, and [so] they kept turning around and playing with each other."

Witnesses claimed that

the two children had turned around to watch the alleged lewd act Helwig performed on Torello, but Helwig denied this. "At one point, they turned around prolonged," she said. "And they're just starout on a "date night" with her husband.



the row to see what the commotion was. She saw "groping." And a certain lewd act. Right there in the seats, during the circus. Wu said the couple had "no shame."

Wu saw the man reach out and give a "high-five" to a little boy in front of him who'd turned to watch the lewd act. Wu declared: "At that point, I had it."

She reached forward and tapped the shoulder of the father of the two children, to alert him about what was happening. The man took his children and put them onto their mother's lap, and then he went to get security.

Wu stood up and used the flashlight function on her cell phone to attract an usher. She called out, "He has his hand on her breast!"

Helwig claims that she corrected the woman. "I said [to her], 'His hand is on my stomach." According to witnesses, Helwig also called Wu a "bitch," but Helwig said, "I never called her a bitch."

#### Helwig said

Helwig said, "I was offended that she would, first of all, think that his hand was on my breast, that I would allow anyone's hands to be on my breast. And that she would announce it to probably about 30 people. It was frustrating and very embarrassing, because at this point she had her hand raised with her cell phone on, [and she was] jumping up and down. Accusing me of something that was not even close to happening. And there was about a radius of 15 feet where everybody is turning around and staring not only at Mrs. Wu and her husband but at myself and Gerald."

One witness said it was not only Wu but her husband and other adults in the area who stood up, trying to get the attention of security personnel.

When a security man arrived, "he sat behind us," Helwig said. She described him as "the person in black who came down and talked to Gerry." This security person said something, and Gerry replied, "Oh, everything's fine." And then, for a while, everyone just watched the show "with no incident."

An altercation ensued As soon as the show ended,

"I had told Gerry, 'Come on, I want to go." Helwig and Torello left promptly, while others in their row remained. They trudged up a ramp of stairs toward the nearest exit, at the edge of the huge tent. When they were at the top of the stairs, next to the exit, they turned around and watched the performers take several curtain calls.

Helwig said the exit door was "closed," although it was not a standard door but two flaps of circus tent that are lifted aside so that patrons may exit. Helwig wanted to go out a different exit, "and as I started to walk, he grabbed my arm and kind of like in a twirly, huggy fashion pulled me back toward him."

Witnesses said that Helwig was punching the air and shadow-boxing. She denied making any "closed-hand punching motions.... There was no play fighting. I was never punching him. We're kissing and tickling. We're playing around. We're trying to have fun. I was trying to have him leave with the impression that we'd had a nice evening."

Witnesses heard Torello say things such as "I



know vou can do it" and "You're not a chicken" and "You're a tough girl." Helwig denied that Torello ever said, "You can take her, babe," or "I've got your back" or anything like that.

Helwig saw Wu. "I had initially noticed her because I heard her saying, 'There she is.'" She knew this was "the woman who had been going back and forth with me" only because she recognized Wu's clothing. Helwig denied being angry or upset, saying only that she found Wu "aggressive."

"As she was approaching me, she kept on yelling at me. 'What are you looking at? What are you going to do?"

Wu's husband passed both women and took another step toward the exit. Helwig claimed this was when Wu made a move. "She steps up in that space and she turns to me and she goes *ump*, and she raised her hand toward me. Within a foot. That would be assaultive. Actively assaultive. And for our use-of-force model, we would then go to the level of 'strikes."

This was the first time she'd ever needed to defend herself outside of work, Helwig said.

#### "I'm a United States Border Patrol agent."

Helwig met Torello through work. They're both Border Patrol agents, both hired in 2008. They met in January 2012, five months before the circus spectacle.

Helwig was 19 when she applied, a tall, slender brunette; she was hired after turning 20, after which she received four months

of training in New Mexico.

Helwig is trained in "defensive tactics" used "in order to defend yourself in any kind of hand-to-hand combat situation or to defuse situations, to affect arrests." That meant one or two hours per day of training for about two months. "And every few months we have to recertify in our defensive tactics and go over arrest techniques and our use-of-force model." Helwig chose to take several additional classes to get "more training on, like, hand-to-hand combat....

"Basically, we have a useof-force scale, so, depending on the actions of the person that you're dealing with, there are appropriate actions that you would take to mitigate or defuse the situation to protect vourself."

Eight months after the incident, when Helwig was







Helwig corrected her. "In a split-second reaction, you don't have time to think about what are all the tactics you can use! You go off instinct."

Helwig described her instinctive moves. After Wu had "put her hands up," then "I immediately felt the need to defend myself and create space and instinctively struck her." Helwig took a step back and used her right hand to slug Wu in the face. Then she took a quick look around. "When I looked back, she had reengaged me and was coming into the aisle where I was. And at that point, there was somebody standing behind me, so there was no way I could create any more space, and I took two more strikes at her face."

Helwig said she had certain "options" if she'd wanted to "inflict pain on her," but "that's not in my nature. I've never had a verbal argument with a stranger, or even a friend." Except for playground fights as a kid, "I've never been in a fight."

#### "She punched me, one two three."

As she walked up the steps, Wu said she was fearful. Helwig "looked like she was practicing to fight." Helwig was "throwing punches in the air." When Wu got close to Helwig, she stopped to "let her through." Wu did not want the air-punching woman to step in behind her, so she made a gesture down at the steps in front of her, "And I said, 'After you."

Wu was surprised by three fast punches to her face. She was hit in the left eve and right jaw, with a third punch to the left side of her head. "I lunged for her, after I got punched." Wu told the jury. "I went in and grabbed her hair, and I pulled her close, so that she couldn't get any more full swings at me."

Wu's husband turned in time to see the first punch. "The female turned around with a hook and she just

hits my wife." He said it was "an attack" that "came out of nowhere."

After the women took hold of each other, Wu's husband claimed that Torello stepped forward and pushed him back, then took hold of Wu from behind. Mr. Wu interjected himself, pushing his arm between Torello and his wife. He said he told Torello that he was drunk and ordered him to "just leave." Fortunately, Torello let go of Mrs. Wu. According to Mr. Wu, Torello walked down the stairs, heading toward the circus arena below.

Torello, however, denied that he was there at all. He denied seeing any part of the altercation between the women.

At one point during the trial, Mr. Wu became red-faced and emotional while testifying. He said, "I

let down my wife" and "I wanted to take the punch." The jury was excused, and the trial was recessed for some minutes so that Mr. Wu could compose himself. Then he finished his evewitness testimony.

Mr. Wu sounded disappointed when he said, "As far as I was concerned, security wasn't around for a very long time."


### Security

"I was alerted to an altercation," said Nicholas Brown, security director for the show that night. Security took control of the situation once he arrived on the scene. Eventually, they started looked for Helwig, who had apparently disappeared. Wu was taken to see a medic, and her bumps and scrapes were photographed.

Helwig for seven to ten minutes. Then sheriff's deputies arrived at about 7:30 p.m. (The show began at 5:00, and it was two-and-half hours long, including a half-hour intermission.) The deputies took over looking for Helwig, which they did for another ten more minutes or so.

During the trial, a prosecutor suggested that Helwig had hidden for at least 20 minutes before deputies persuaded her mother to phone her and request that she return. After an additional five minutes, Helwig was seen approaching from the area of the parking lot.

Helwig did not agree with this characterization. "When [deputies] arrived, I was back on scene within minutes, because I had already been walking back."

#### "No. I did not bolt."

The prosecutor accused Helwig of running away after she attacked Wu. "No, I did not bolt. I was very embarrassed. My brassiere was out of my shirt. I was disoriented. I had just been attacked by three people. I'm alone. I do not know any of these people. Gerald is nowhere to be seen. My [mom] — I don't even know where [she is]. I don't know if [she's] amongst the crowd of people. I'm yelling for [her], and I go outside. I don't see anybody. I've never been in a fight. I've never been in that circumstance, and these are out of the parameters of work. At work we have protocol. We have our immediate weapons. We have radio. We have backup. Out in the public it's just us. I'm not armed. I do not have a badge and credentials. I'm

a citizen."

Deputy McCormick said of Helwig, "She didn't seem nearly as intoxicated as the male subject [Torello]." One of the deputies took Torello to the Encinitas Sheriff's Station for three hours. Once he'd sobered up he was released. Deputies said they gave him a "citation" for public intoxication.

Deputy McCormick "cited" Helwig for misdemeanor battery, and then she was released.

The deputy said that Wu and her husband did not appear intoxicated at all.

According to Wu, the father of the two children in front of them came up to her after the scuffle and offered her his phone number. But she didn't want to bother him and declined. She later regretted that.

That night, Wu filled out paperwork for a citizen's



arrest of Helwig. She said she hoped both Helwig and Torello would be "charged appropriately" and that "justice would be served."

Wu waited some weeks for the sheriff's department to complete their investigation. She contacted a sheriff's investigator who said the matter had been forwarded to the district attorney's office. Wu spoke with a man there. "He said that basically there was no case." The man at the district attorney's office didn't recognize the case number, which the sheriff's investigator had given Wu. "I was pretty disillusioned," she said. She was also "scared" because she knew that both Helwig and Torello were "licensed to carry weapons."

Wu was approached by two San Diego television stations about the incident and she agreed to anonymous interviews. "I wanted the public to know."

The altercation happened on May 27, 2012. On July 6, a defense attorney went to the courthouse and officially received the charges, or "arraigned" both defendants. This happened at a counter, a clerk on the other side. The clerk checked a box that allowed both defendants to remain out on their own recognizance.

Neither defendant was ordered into a courtroom until August, when judge Daniel Goldstein demanded they appear in his court to hear a verbal "stay-away order," which would protect Wu. The judge remarked at the time, "You have to take misdemeanors serious, too. They're crimes."

A misdemeanor jury trial The trial was held in San Diego's North County Superior Courthouse.

**Prosecutor Tracy Prior** said, "Nothing about this was a fight. It was an attack." She said, "This is more than disturbing conduct." As Border Patrol agents, "they should know better."

The district attorney's office charged Helwig with misdemeanor battery. The penal code describes battery as "any willful and unlawful use of force or violence upon the person of another."

Helwig claimed selfdefense. "After the totality of circumstances, knowing that [Wu] could have taken another exit, knowing that she could have gone on the other side of the aisle and walked out where there was a bar in between us, seeing her push her husband out of the way so that she could be closer to me,

her pointing at me, keeping engaged eye contact with me, repeatedly asking me what I was going to do in an aggressive manner, all led me to believe that she was going to assault me."

The first week of February 2013, a jury was selected for the misdemeanor trial of Helwig and Torello.

Mid-week, during trial, the judge threw out one count of "annoy child" that had been charged against both defendants. The prosecutor had noted that the offending couple was "inches away from a family with two young children." Superior Court judge Harry Elias also dismissed one charge of "making criminal threat," which had been filed because witnesses described Torello as having threatened to "kill" someone if they spoke to his

date again. Every remaining crime was charged as a misdemeanor.

Helwig took the witness stand in her own defense for two and a half hours.

The jury went into deliberations on February 7. They deliberated thoughtfully, requesting hours of transcripts to be read back to them by the court reporter. They announced their verdicts on February 11.

The jury reached only one unanimous "guilty" verdict: they found Helwig guilty of battery on Wu.

The jury declared Helwig and Torello "not guilty" of one lewd act, that act allegedly occurring at intermission — the "hands-downthe-pants" incident.

The jury deadlocked on the second lewd-act charge, the head-in-lap allegation. They also deadlocked on whether Torello was guilty of battery on Wu as an "aider and abettor," for allegedly encouraging Helwig verbally.

The jury foreman reported after the verdicts that the defense attorneys had done a good job of creating reasonable doubt, and that jurors had given a lot of weight to Jury Instruction Number 224. That specific instruction states: If you can draw two or more reasonable conclusions from the evidence. and one conclusion points to innocence and one points to guilt, you must accept the one that points to innocence. (This is not the entire jury instruction.)

For the single guilty verdict against Helwig, for misdemeanor battery, she was sentenced to three years "summary" or unsupervised probation and two days of public service.

### **Nuclear station** shuttered

Power plant will close permanently, says Edison San Onofre — The ongoing saga over the future of the San Onofre Nuclear **Generating Station along** San Diego's northern coast appears to be drawing to a close. Edison International, parent company of plant operator Southern California Edison, said this morning that the plant will be shuttered permanently due to federal regulators not complying with the utility's demand for a quick response to a proposal to restart one of the plant's two troubled nuclear reactors on an experimental

The plant has been in a state-of-emergency shutdown since January 2012, when a tube burst at one of the plant's steam generators. Further inspection revealed much greater damage than anticipated to the generators, which were installed in 2009 at a cost to utility customers of at least \$670 million.

### **UCAN:** "irredeemably corrupt"

Langley resigns from so-called watchdog

San Diego - Charles Langley, the well-known and respected executive of Utility **Consumers' Action Network** (UCAN) has resigned. He joined the group in 1996 at \$25,000 a year. His salary has been slashed to \$32,000, which adjusted for inflation is less than he was hired for.


Langley and David Peffer, who has also resigned, were the whistleblowers who pointed out numerous examples of wrongdoing at the purported "watchdog." Their charges were recently validated when UCAN filed a cross-complaint against its former director, Michael Shames. The suit cited exactly the wrongdoing that Langley and Peffer had told the board about. However, their revelations were met with a massive cover-up attempt.

It is not clear whether Peffer and/or Langlev will pursue constructive termination suits against UCAN. Among many things, the cross-complaint charged that Shames had farmed out lawsuits to private attorneys who reaped fat profits from work that had been done by UCAN, a nonprofit.

Langley points out that Shames's lawyer in his suit against UCAN. Hallen Rosner, is a former UCAN board member who reaped many of those gains in the private class-action lawsuits in which UCAN did the original legwork. But UCAN has not moved aggressively to have Rosner removed from the suit, says Langley.

## Not in my park

SOHO counter-appeals; Plaza de Panama fight won't die

Balboa Park — As historic preservation group Save Our Heritage Organisation has learned, the bypass bridge is a tough proposal to kill. But the group hopes to end it once and for all with a June 3 cross-appeal filed in San **Diego County Superior Court.** 

The appeal is in response to a previous appeal filed by the Plaza de Panama Committee, which seeks to overturn judge Timothy Taylor's ruling against their proposal to remove traffic from the plaza by bypassing the Cabrillo Bridge.

By filing the crossappeal, SOHO hopes to force the committee to defend what they say are other legal snares, such as charging for parking at the proposed parking garage and possible CEQA violations.

"Since the Plaza de Panama Committee has now filed an appeal," reads a statement from SOHO director Bruce Coons, "SOHO has cross-appealed on the issues on which it did not prevail in court or which the trial judge did not need to reach after ruling in favor of SOHO, including interpretation of laws preventing a paid parking garage in the 'free and public park,' adherence to the City's general and specific plans, and compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act."

Not only have they had to fight the Irwin Jacobsbacked project committee, they've had to deal with a council that has been very supportive of the plan.

In early April, city attorney Jan Goldsmith released a memo stating that the project could be raised from the dead if a new applicant were to come forward.

The opinion was good news for council president Todd Gloria, a supporter of the proposal. "If an applicant comes forward to

### Papa's latest move revives Times takeover talk

**U-T** partnering with a Kochtied nonprofit

San Diego/Beyond SD — Is nonprofit journalism, the growing practice of using tax-free foundation dollars to sponsor what used to be done by now-fading advertiser-supported media, just for liberals?

Not if San Diego hotel magnate and GOP publisher Douglas Manchester's U-T San Diego has anything to say about it — and it does, in a new "collaborative project of editorials and independent commentaries." created "in partnership" with a Virginia nonprofit corporation that has been tied to the conservative billionaire brothers Charles and David Koch.

On Sunday, the U-T rolled out its latest:

"Today, the U-T San Diego Editorial Board. in partnership with the Franklin Center for Government and Public Integrity, launches a project that we boldly hope will help change the direction of California before the Golden State becomes a failed state. Our assessment is informed by weeks of research along with lengthy interviews with key Democrats and Republicans."

According to the paper's announcement, Manchester's friend and political ally, Carl DeMaio, the excouncilman and failed GOP mayoral candidate now running against Democratic congressman Scott Peters, will offer his wisdom on "the proper size of

government."

In addition, says the *U-T*, its "impressive lineup" of governmental expertise includes "former Gov. Grav Davis on how the Democrats became beholden to

the special interests of the Left, and former Gov. Pete Wilson on how the Republican Party lost its way in California.'

But what exactly is the Franklin Center and precisely what role is it playing in the U-T crusade?


Depending on who's doing the talking, Franklin is either a faithful watchdog of big government or a right-wing plot to destroy legitimate iournalism.

### Jury: Hood ain't good

Unanimous guilty verdict at child-abuse trial

Oceanside/Vista — "The evidence was overwhelming."

"His testimony was totally unbelievable. He blamed everybody else. everybody else was lying, it was all a conspiracy against him."

"We know the difference 'tween right and wrong."

**Jurors made comment** in a courthouse hallway after their unanimous guilty verdicts were announced against Daniel Hood, now convicted of all 11 childabuse charges. The jury of seven men and five women heard evidence for one week, then deliberated for a little more than one hour before their reaching their decision yesterday afternoon, June 3.

Daniel Roger Hood, 43, faced the jury from the witness box last week to denv he was the one who took the incriminating video clips found on his cell phone. "It wasn't easy to look at those videos," one female juror commented late vesterday.

**Prosecutor Keith Wata**nabe estimated that a dozen or so prospective jurors asked to be excused after learning they would be required to see video evidence of a nine-year-old girl being abused by an adult

The videos were taken in the mother's rented home in Oceanside (identified by furniture in the room) in 2011, when the woman lived there with her 9-yearold daughter and Hood.

Now 11 years old, the child testified for about an hour, accompanied by her teddy bear.

The child's father is expected to speak at the sentencing of the abuser, who could be sentenced to more than 100 years prison.



What was intended to follow was the forcible return of the English people to the Catholic fold — and no doubt a return to the persecutions inflicted by Elizabeth's sister and predecessor, Mary Tudor ("Bloody Mary").

As it turned out, the English, even those who remained Catholic, had their fill of religious strife. They supported Elizabeth out of patriotic nationalism, and the Jesuits never got a foot-

hold. It helped immensely that Elizabeth herself was ahead of her time in matters of religious tolerance. She once declared, "There is only one Christ, Jesus, one faith. All else is a dispute over trifles."

It is true that there were persecutions under her reign. But, "The persecution...was prompted by political necessity, not religious fanaticism .... The priests who were executed had committed crimes against the state, and were perceived as a very real threat to national security." — The Life Of Elizabeth, Alison Weir, 1998.

## UCSD's Stuart Collection

A 12-foot-high red shoe among trees; a house perched on the edge of a seven-story building; a 370,000-pound, 23-foottall stone bear sitting in a grass courtyard. Eighteen site-specific works by 18 artists dot La Jolla's 1200-acre UCSD campus. Known as the Stuart Collection and under agreement with UCSD to consider any spot on campus for installations, it has been growing since its inaugural work — now a campus icon — was erected in 1983. Called Sun God — it's a 14-foot multi-colored, goldencrowned bird perched on a 15-foot concrete arch. While walking the 3.4-mile sculpture "loop," don't forget to carve

Reserve the free hourlong tour in advance by phone and specify language preference. The tour gets you a free beer from the adjacent beer garden, which is open Monday–Friday, 10am– 5pm, and Saturday from 10am-2pm while tour hours are further limited.

Social Cycle is a 16-person Dutch bicycle bus that can be rented for private parties for city tours and pub crawls. Six passengers are required to pedal the bike, but each bike bus can carry up to 16 people per tour. Weekend rental goes for \$200 per hour, while weekdays will set you back \$185 per hour. The company offers four different guided city tours. Pick from the Gaslamp; North/South Park; Bankers Hill/Hillcrest and Hillcrest/University Heights. They are also open to custom tours.

## San Antonio Necua Campground

Off Ensenada-Tecate Hwy 3 (at Km. 73.5 take dirt road; continue approximately 5 miles; pass L.A. Cetto Winery; follow signs to Necua), Valle de Guadalupe, B.C., Mexico. Reservations: Horacio Moncada: 646-108-9278, 646-178-8093, horacio.moncada@gmail.com

Take a multi-day trip of the dozens of wineries in Mexico's Valle de Guadalupe on the cheap by camping in between. 

Put \$2 in the drop box at the southwest corner of the Alcazar Garden parking lot in Balboa Park for access to this 40-target, 28-acre walking course.



The package includes a 7mm wetsuit, hood, fins, gloves, goggles, snorkel, gauge, and dive light. Anyone over 16 years old must have a valid fishing license (\$20) and the elusive crustaceans must be caught by hand (no snares or spears).

### **Adobe Falls**

With an urge to explore, but with little time for an all-day trekking venture, the Mission Valley Adobe Falls is a ten-minute hike off the freeway. Located by I-8 across from San Diego State University, two multi-tiered waterfalls channel Alvarado Creek on its way to join the San Diego River a couple of miles to the west. To get to the falls, park at the west end of Adobe Falls Road. Walk around the fence and follow the dirt road toward the freeway. When the road ends, follow the trail that will lead to the Adobe Falls rock formations. You will have to scramble and crawl up a few rocks to spot the falls. The rock graffiti, reminding passers-by of the close proximity to a college campus, adds an interesting touch, depending on one's outlook.

## Disney cartoons at the 805/52 interchange

Where two prominent San Diego highways meet are works of art known only to a few locals. Painted on the pilings that support the bridge is a slew of life-sized cartoon murals. From Daffy Duck to Snow White and all seven of her dwarfs. the display makes an ideal photo-snapping shot. The cartoons can be accessed on foot — walk through Marian Bear Memorial Park. Go east under the freeway and look for the giant patch of color under the bridge.

### La Jolla Cave Store

Dazzling with shades of ruby iron oxide and pinkish purple iodine, Sunny Jay's historic cave is a near-literal hidden gem in La Jolla. Perched on the seaside cliffs of California's coastal elite, La Jolla's oldest store rests atop the only ocean cave in California accessible by land. You can reach the cave by

way of a 145-step stairway that was carved more than a century ago into one of La Jolla's natural sea caves. The store at the top of the tunnel sells the usual hats, T-shirts, and postcards as well as hand-crafted jewelry. Snorkel gear is rented year round for \$20. Entrance is \$4 for adults and \$3 for children.

### Rainbow Drum Circle

Whether you march to the beat of your own drum or just like to watch, the Rainbow Drum Circle is open to participants and observers every Sunday afternoon in Balboa Park.

The group meets in the southwest section of the park, near Marston Point, just north of the old Fire Alarm building, on the east side of Balboa Drive as it turns north. The rhythmic banging usually begins between 2:30 and 3 p.m. The drummers lay out various percussion instruments in the center for anyone to explore and play with. Enter from Sixth Avenue by turning on El Prado. Turn right and go south. The Rainbow Drum Circle gathers on Balboa Drive.

## Bald eagles in Ramona

Wildlife Research Institute, 18030 Highland Valley Road, Ramona, 760.789.3992, wildlife-research.org For the first time in Ramona's recorded history they have nesting bald eagles. Head out to the Wildlife Research Center's surrounding grasslands off of Rangeland Road to catch a glimpse of two adults and one baby bald eagle that have set up in a eucalyptus tree. The Ramona Grasslands and the Wildlife Research center are open year round for bird-watching. View golden eagles, wintering ferruginous hawks, redtailed hawks, prairie falcons, and red-shouldered hawks, to name a few. Nineteen species of raptors have been sighted in the Ramona Grasslands. In January-February, the Wildlife Research center hosts a guided hawk tour

The Pavilion, also known as the Mushroom House because of its fungal shape, has been dubbed by This Old House magazine one of the world's wildest houses. Built in 1968 at the bottom of a 300-foot cliff, the concrete abode was built to withstand earthquakes and high tides. Original owner Sam Bell wanted

a unique guesthouse connected to his mansion. Although the 300-foot tramway connecting the house to the road is out of commission, the Mushroom House is reachable to curious trekkers.

There is an interactive tank where visitors can touch the rays and view native sharks. Raptor Row houses hawks, owls, kestrels, and a turkey vulture. Out in the tidal slough habitat, you can catch a glimpse of native water and shorebirds. Take a 1.5-mile stroll from the Discovery Center down the walking trail toward San Diego Bay. 

#### Kanas, China By James Michael Dorsey

In the northwestern corner of the country, where a finger of land divides the land from Kazakhstan, Russia, and Mongolia, the traveler will find myth, legend, and a way of life unchanged in a thousand years.

While officially Chinese, the people are primarily Uyghurs, eastern European Muslims interspersed with a fine smattering of nomadic Mongols who roam freely over the three mentioned borders with no regard to nationality or race. The Uyghurs have clashed frequently and violently with the majority Han Chinese over several decades as they cling to their traditional way of life, keep to themselves, and shun the accommodations of their Chinese masters who have always treated them like less than citizens, while the Mongols pay tribute to no one but their tribal leaders, recognizing no higher secular authority.

Uyghur men are identifiable by their long, neatly groomed beards and fourcornered skull caps, while the women wear heavy henna tattoos and cover their entire head with a heavy burlaplike scarf. The Mongols dress a bit more Western, perhaps due to the worldly exposure their wanderings offer them. But it's a bit disconcerting to see a fellow in cowboy hat with a lasso astride a

Bactrian camel.

It is a land where established religion has collided head-on with animism. native superstition, and ancient esoteric ritual. Lamas (Tibetan Buddhist priests, not the animal) are more important than government officials, and shamans are an integral part of everyday life. More than anything, it is a land of faith, where ancient ways have taken on the veneer of religious belief.

In the main town of Kanas — a tiny wooden ville snuggled in a lost valley surrounded by snowcapped mountains — rows of neat log cabins, left behind by Soviet-era loggers, line the dirt streets where apothecary shops are filled with animal parts waiting to be ground into active ingredients for curing any physical malady or for use as ceremonial offerings. Coils of sundried snakes and lizards twist and turn in the breeze like so many mobiles, while seller stalls offer powdered beetle and dehydrated frogs.

Reindeer are kept in tiny pens, not as work animals or pets, but to produce new antlers, annually, after the old ones are sawed off and shipped to major cities to be sold as aphrodisiacs at exorbitant prices.

Riding over the rolling hills on a camel, you can hear the multiple layered melodies of Tuvan throat singers emanating from the felt yurts that dot the countryside like giant mushrooms. White silk katas (prayer scarves) twist in the wind, identifying the cabin of a lama. You might witness a young eagle being trained to hunt rabbits for its owner.

Inside every home you will find a shrine to Genghis Khan (himself a practicing shaman), usually an artist's portrait surrounded by votive candles and food offerings to a spirit most believe still wanders the valleys.

Because of Kanas' proximity to three other nations, there is a strong military presence that offers the paradoxical sight of jack-booted Chinese soldiers walking alongside felt-booted nomads.

This traveler was fortunate to have been there during a full solar eclipse, and it was more fascinating to watch the people than the eclipse itself. As the moon began to move in front of the sun, people began screaming and cowering. Mothers grabbed their babies and huddled on the ground with them in their arms. Many ran into buildings in full flight. A minor panic spread throughout the village, and as full darkness covered the land there was suddenly absolute silence, as though

everyone was waiting for the apocalypse to strike with full force. As the moon passed, many raised their arms to the heavens in what I assume were prayers, and I can only wish I had been with one of the lamas at the time to see his reaction to this natural phenomenon.

Even more than the physical trappings of Kanas, it was the reaction of the people to a completely natural wonder that revealed the mindset of an

entire region of China and made me realize how time had stopped there long ago.

The Chinese government kept Kanas off limits to the public for years but now is in the process of filling the valley with prefabricated structures that will soon pass for their version of four-star tourist hotels. The traveler should note, though, that regardless of tourist-friendly advertising, in the more remote areas such as this one, there will be more and more police roadblocks and random searches.

I was constantly harassed by young thugs who wear police badges but, in truth, work for the Communist party, keeping the rural population in line with brutal and sometimes physical repression.

Fascinating as China is, for the solo traveler, it can be a harrowing place.

San Diego Outdoors with the Canyoneers

#### **BIG LAGUNA-GATOS SPUR**

Pines, oaks, and incense cedar on this six-mile loop of the Gatos Big Laguna Trail Spur

**Distance from downtown San Diego**: 53 miles. Allow 60 minutes driving time to the Cleveland National Forest. From I-8, exit north on Sunrise Hwy. (SR-1) and go 8.3 miles to Wooded Hill Rd. Turn left and drive about 0.4 mile to the Agua Dulce Trailhead parking lot. A National Forest Adventure Pass is required to park.

Facilities

**Hiking length:** Six miles. **Difficulty:** Intermediate with an elevation gain/loss of approximately 700 feet. Gatos Spur has a bicycle track. Bring a lot of water (it can get hot between the shady areas), snacks, and sunscreen.

When it becomes too warm to hike in the desert but it's still overcast at the beach, it is time to head to the mountains. Wooded Hill in the Laguna Mountains is a lovely escape, but if you are looking for a longer, less-steep hike, a

loop through the Big Laguna Trail spurs hits the perfect note. True to the area named Wooded Hill, this loop trail features large Jeffrey pine, black oak, and incense cedar, providing intermittent shade throughout the loop.

Walk north through the metal gate, continuing down the paved road. After approximately one-quarter mile, you will see a barbed-wire fence with wooden supports to the right of the road. Walk through the opening, turn right at the graveled road, then left as the fire road follows the Agua Creek. Continue taking left turns on trails until getting back to this point, where a right turn and then a left on the Old Country Road brings you back to the start of the trailhead. While on the trail, note the following:

Just past the left fork on Agua Dulce Road, there will be an old, lichen-covered incense cedar, dramatically tall, and a huge pine tree riddled with holes from acorn woodpeckers. Some holes are filled with acorns, where the woodpeckers secure their larders. These are known as granary trees. You will hear and see stellar jays, juncos, nuthatches, crows, ravens, and many other birds


among the trees. Through the tree branches you can spot red-tail hawks and turkey vultures soaring overhead.

With the presence of so many old, large Quercus kelloggii (black oak trees, more than 200 years old, judging by the size), you can expect to encounter morteros — divots in stone outcroppings where the Kumeyaay Indians used to grind the acorns into flour. The black oak acorns were prized for their relatively low tannin content, requiring less rinsing and processing to prepare for food. About 2.8 miles from the trailhead there are three large rocks: morteros can be seen on the top surface. This shaded area is a good place to stop for lunch.

along the wooded trail include checkerbloom, Indian paintbrush, white and yellow yarrows, wild rose, western chokecherry, ceanothus, yellow violets, and stinging nettle. Horkelia, a favored food for Laguna Mountain skipper butterflies, may also be encountered.

Native plants found

After leaving the morteros, the trail crosses fields with many different plants sporting yellow flowers in the spring, including baby yellow stars, goldfields, tidy tips, and the



cream puff poppy, which dots the meadow. Fortunately, there is not much poison oak, although if you cannot tell the difference between basket bush (common in this area) and poison oak, it would be prudent to give the "leaves of three" a wide berth.

Just past the barbed-wire fence enclosure, take the left fork onto

the Gatos spur, which has technical challenges for bicycles along the trail, including logs to ride either lengthwise or multiple ones laid crosswise.

The trail can be an aromatic experience as well. The bark of the Jeffrey pine has a sweet, butterscotchlike aroma. The cedars carry their own characteristic fragrance. If lunines are in bloom when hiking, note the many varieties along this trail, including the grapesoda lupine (ves. it smells just like grape soda!) and giant lupine. Take care not to get too entranced with the aromas and pay attention to what's ahead and behind you on the trail since mountain bikes and horses share this space.

This loop can also be traveled in the opposite direction by taking the second left once off the Old

Country Road. Be on the lookout for bicyclists.

Canyoneers are San Diego Natural History Museum volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks that teach appreciation for the great outdoors. For a schedule of free public hikes, refer to the San Diego Natural History Museum website.

San Diego Reader: What is your favorite subject

on which to preach?

Pastor Steve Brown: The most important thing to me is that others understand the Gospel message that we're saved by faith alone and Christ alone through grace. Once they understand that, then I'm rabidly committed to discipleship.

SDR: What is your main concern as a member of the clergy? PB: Biblical illiteracy is my main concern. We do not teach the congregation or average Christian to read and interpret Scripture with the author's intended meaning so we end up with a whole lot of pastors' meanings instead of going after what the author intended. That's why we have to have good hermeneutics and that word is important. It's self-policing, so we don't develop our theology or create religion man-style, but allow

the Bible to create our theol-

ogy where it uses the totality

of Scripture.

**PB**: It wasn't my choice — but

it was a gift and a calling. I had a passion and burden to help others to come to know Jesus and grow in their relationship with him.

**SDR**: What's the mission of vour church?

PB: The mission of our church is short and sweet — we say that the great commission and a great commitment govern everything we do. We express living out the love of Jesus for all people so we can be a living witness to non-believers and that we can be a hospital for those who have experienced legalism and find they have been in a very judgmental environment.

**SDR**: You mention that after three months of dialogue and "courting the Holy Spirit," you recently took up Torrey Pines Christian Church's invitation to share their campus. What change has your church's mission undergone since the move? PB: As we have always focused on reaching the lost and unchurched, that led us to seek out other pastors who are like-minded and willing to drop those invisible walls and say that "these are my people." In reality, none of the people in a local church belong to us but to Jesus. When we can understand that and trust the Holy Spirit, it creates a lot of freedom for churches to work together.... It's fun to be outside the box, work together with other churches and not try to do everything yourself. We came to a point where both

churches were able to trust that this was a "God thing." We hope this is a testimony to the Christian community but also to the non-Christian community who often sees the Christian churches as islands unto themselves.

**SDR**: Where do you go when you die?

PB: One of two places heaven or hell. The amazing thing about God is that we don't deserve heaven and he has given us the free gift of eternal life and given each of us the ability to choose where we want to spend eternal life. In other words, God doesn't make that choice for us, but we get to choose whether we want to receive that gift of eternal life through the forgiveness that Jesus offers by his substitutionary death on the cross. If we choose to reject God's plan of salvation for us, then we will get exactly what we want which is separation from God for eternity.



## Rich little number

I lift one from his plate. It's great, sweet, a little hot.... I go for one of the \$3 "outrageous" tacos instead.

ai tío? It's a Thai phrase. Sounds like bye tee-oh. Been picking up a few of these from Thai friends.

To bai tío means to go out and have fun, screw around, don't do anything, like, responsible. Love it.

And, this could be one of those days! Finished a job this morning, did some chores, and now it's past 4:30 p.m. That's

it. Taking the rest of the day off. Got exactly \$30 lining my pocket. Carla's working, can't be interrupted. So, what the heck: Bai tío!

Only rule? The bai tío rule: got to spend every penny.

I get off the bus at 12th and Imperial. Whip into the A-Mart, grab a \$1.25 coffee, a countryfried-chicken cheeseburger (like a burger, only with a chicken patty, not beef) for \$5, add a fruit salad for \$3.99, and head over to a narrow counter that looks out over the trolley tracks. This counter is where the trolley drivers and security guards hang out, write their reports, eat lunch.

Ten minutes' walking time later, here I am up at Fifth and K. Figured I might stop off somewhere for happy hour. I mean, it's five o'clock somewhere? Hey, it's five o'clock here: Transit Center's clock tower is donging right now.

I take a quick survey of happy-hour possibles. Look in at Lou and Mickey's, the Chicago seafood-and-steak house. But you have to sit in the out-of-the-sun narrow sidewalk seats if you want the happy-hour specials, not their beautiful big flowery patio facing the convention center. Next door, in the Hilton Gaslamp? Nada. Rockin' Baja Lobster, at Fifth and K? Good happy hour, but they separate the happy-hour customers here, too. You have to sit inside at the bar, Second-class citizens? Nuh-uh, I wanna be where the action is.

Last place I try is Toscana Café and Wine Bar, across from Rockin' Baja. Irena, the Russian girl at the welcome podium, says to sit where you like, happy hour's on (it's daily, 3:00-6:00

p.m.). and they have Stone Arrogant Bastard draft for four bucks.

I sit down at one of the red-brown marble-

topped tables in the patio. Chairs are woven black metal with orange cushions. Scarlet geraniums burst out of boxes on the windowsill. Classy.

For happy hour, you get a choice of some of the dinner appetizers at half-price. Bruschetta's

normally \$9.95, so that'd be \$5. A white-bean Mediterranean dip with veggies and grilled garlic crostini is also \$5. Prosciutto-wrapped mozzarella's normal price is \$15.95. So, figure \$8.

But the one I go for is the sausage plate. "Slices of grilled Italian sausage and chickenapplewood sausage served on a bed of baby arugula tossed with olive oil and lemon." Costs \$6 during happy hour. Tim the waiter comes by and I order it up, plus the A. Bastard, natch.

The sausages when they come look like skinned cats' tails, long, thin sausages sliced lengthwise. But they're herby, light, totally delicious. The salad's got some sweet vinegar in it, which gives a nice boost to the sausage flavors. Arrogant Bastard goes great, too, with its hoppiness against the slightly sweet package of the herby sausages and sweet-sauced arugula.

Bonus: Tim brings me three toasted crostini with dark, sweet balsamic vinegar squirted over them to round out the salad-sausage combination. No charge.

I sit, chomp, slurp, listen to the sound system playing "The Lady Is a Tramp."

But the greatest pleasure comes when the setting sun suddenly angles up K Street from the bay and floods the whole patio in golden light. The red geraniums are electric. And it only hits our patio. Folks on the street notice it and come in to be part of it.

Nine bucks plus tax I've spent here. Add in the \$11 from A-Mart. Twenty down, ten to go.

I cross K. Crowd at Rockin' Baja Lobster seems to be having fun...even at the bar where the happy-hour customers are corralled. Oh

well, if you can't beat 'em, join 'em. I head in.

Place is covered in Baja murals. Baja memorabilia, lotsa signs: "If you're drinking to forget, please pay in advance"; "Same Day Service"; "Drink till he's Cute."



Irena the hostess says sit where you like during Toscana's happy hour.

I get a Bud Light (\$4)...big taste comedown from the Arrogant Bastard. Then I find out I could've had Dos Equis Amber or Tecate for the same price. Dang.

Travis, guy on the next stool, is working on a plate of Gnarly Nachos (\$7); he's added chicken for an extra two bucks. Plus, he's got some "Sweet and Spicy" calamari (\$7). In a, like, soup plate with a handle.

"Try the calamari," Travis offers. "It's really

The tacos do have outrageous names, like "Taco Chingones" (don't even ask). But I'd rather have Surf-and-Turf. It seems like only a second before the chef's putting it down in front of me, steaming hot.

It's a rich little number. Carne asada chunks, two big juicy shrimp, plus avocado, cheese, red onion, cilantro, tomato, and a stripe of mayo-ish sauce, all crowded aboard two corn tortillas that look as if they've been grilled. Oozy-delicious.

Oh, man. Now I'm truly feeling bellystretched. But still got a couple of bucks left. I head back out onto Fifth.

That's when Carlos Cerecero comes by with his guitar. He's dressed like a gypsy troubadour, a red bandanna tied around his brow. He's doing the café rounds.

"I've been singing on this street since 1953, when I was ten," he says. "It used to have 300 nightclubs in the Stingaree. Now it's...changed."

I haul out my last two Washingtons.

"Do you know 'Malagueña Salerosa'?" "'La Malagueña'? Of course."

He belts out a beautiful version of the story of the salty lady from Malaga. It's always the first one I ask for when I go to Tijuana, a Mexican song about this poor guy trying to seduce a fine Spanish lady. The song's not just saucy, but haunting, plus the guitar work's pretty darned difficult. When it's done well, that's a good day.

This is a good day.

Perfect, actually. The whole afternoon. Makes me remember another phrase my Thai buddies taught me: sanuk di.

"That was fun!" ■

## Moonshine, brats, and duck confit

Salt and Cleaver has been open for a little while, but I hadn't had a chance to go check it out until

now. The extensive remodel on the building's interior put a lot of distance between the new restaurant

and the old Cote Sud. According to the website, Salt and Cleaver is supposed to be modeled after 1860s industrial Chicago. That seems oddly specific, but it did come out looking good in there; much more a romantic dream of industry than an Upton Sinclair slaughterhouse nightmare. It helps that they were playing great music.

At first, the cynics say, "Hey. Cool. How is this not just the Linkery in Hillcrest?"

And to some extent they are correct. Salt and Cleaver resembles the Linkery if you paint a picture in broad strokes. The devil, as they say, is in the details.

The delight at Salt and Cleaver is how the sausages are dressed up. Take the Duck. Duck.Pig (\$12), for instance. The duck and pork sausage was

good, but the application of frisée and orange supremes sealed the deal. The little bites of duck confit didn't hurt, either.

On their IPA Bratwurst (\$9) it was the snappy sauerkraut, pungent mustard, flavorful roasted peppers, and chewy pretzel bun that gave the sausage its robust character.

Cucumber fries (\$4) were an excellent, and novel, side dish of long, thin spears of cucumber tossed in spices and a light oil. Served with a tangy tzatziki sauce, the cool snap of the cucumbers was a good balance for the rich sausages. Regular french fries (\$4) were hot, crispy, and fried hard with a double-dip in the hot fryer.

With a glut of beers on tap and a full bar, Salt and Cleaver won't be leaving anyone thirsty. I tried a mule drink made with a California moonshine (a different brand than the Kill Devil moonshine

I mused over a while back). My first instinct? It tasted like vodka. This merits further investigation.

Salt and Cleaver was not cheap. A couple drinks and sausages for two pushed the bill up past 60 bucks, which seemed like a splurge on brats and moonshine. A fine line separates a Wisconsin, backwoods barbecue and a happening new Hillcrest restaurant.


#### Technology at the dinner table

In this vast and untamed American future, just about everybody carries a mobile device.

While most of us have been subjected to impromptu tirades about smartphone etiquette ("not at the din-

ner table/7/Eleven checkout/live concert/in public ever") at the behest of yesteryear nicks who are still learning to cope with the modern world's obsessive love/hate relationship with technology, local author Jenz Johnson posits that it is time to move forward and embrace our pocket 'puters as allies.

In his latest book, *Mobo Brain*, Johnson suggests we digest information along with our entrées by committing the ultimate techno-taboo: playing with our phones during dinner.

Following suit with Albert Einstein's assertion that one should "never memorize something you can look up," Johnson presents a handful of scenarios in which bringing your smartphone to supper is not only appropriate, but advantageous.

Students, for example, can use meals as study time by saving test materials to a mobile device along with virtual clippings of books, articles, and personal notebooks.

For non-students who want to spice up dinner conversation, Johnson advises:

"If you know the group of friends with whom you are dining is likely to fall into a debate about politics, you can save pieces of articles, charts and quotes to back up your points of view. If you know you'll be talking sports, you can use your mobile brain to do more than just settle arguments as to which quarterback had the most touchdown passes — anyone could Google that — you can delve deeper into arcane knowledge and save the most salient bits on your phone to rip apart over dessert."

He goes on to show how to use a smartphone or tablet to data dump just about everything — recipes, task lists, project notes — and gives pointers on optimizing time spent in lines by reviewing and revising lists or studying.

But before you discard Johnson's pro-phone philosophy as anti-social, quixotic, or just plain rude, check out his online guide to smartphone etiquette, which outlines a new protocol for integrating technology into our daily lives.

Underlying his vision of a pro-mobile world

is the belief that technology should be used to augment the conversation at the table, not escape from it.

## Prepping for a Pig Out

It's always fun hanging with chefs. I've had the pleasure of interviewing many in my day, but the most enjoyable gastronome interminglings I've experienced have

been during after-work chef meet-ups. One-onone interviews are friendly enough, but mostly business-like. Get a bunch of chefs together offthe-clock and you're guaranteed plenty of shop talk, ball-busting, laughter, and beer.

The last pro culinarian assembly I attended happened last week at Carnitas' Snack Shack. Owner and pork-loving chef Hanis Cavin was hosting an early planning meeting with seven of his contemporaries going by the collective nickname the Crazy Eight (originally, it was the Elite Eight, but apparently lunacy won out over highbrowism), for an event taking place in October at the Handlery Hotel (950 Hotel Circle North, Mission Valley).

It's unusual for chefs to plan this far in advance for an event, but this one, dubbed the Heavenly Hog Fall Pig-Out, is an ambitious one. Conceived by the Handlery's Karl Prohaska, innovator of events including the Mission Valley Craft Beer Food Festival and the Five Chef Societe Dinner, it's intended to serve as the ultimate pairing dinner. And though the octet spent the evening downing ales from Green Flash, Societe, and Ballast Point, many intend to go beyond beer for the Pig-Out.

According to Prohaska, anything goes, where beverages are concerned — rare beers, esoteric wines, small-batch spirits. The only mandate is that they must go perfectly with each chef's dish. All of those plates will center around the use of a particular cut of pork. In addition to potent potables, the chefs are aiming to use as many different parts from Heritage Pork hogs as possible. The most exciting moment in the meeting came when each chef pulled

#### **Worldly birds**

At the end of a narrow walkway tucked between two shops on Girard Avenue in La Jolla is a sweet little gem of a restaurant called Finch's Bistro and Wine

I discovered Finch's a few months ago, during a tasting event. I'd expected it to be a simple French bistro, so I was surprised when I found the diverse flavor origins listed beside what was an eclectic selection of dishes. France, Japan, Rome, Portofino, South Africa were represented by mushroom pâté, ahi poke wanton, stuffed squash blossoms, shrimp, and "bobotie."

My favorite thing about tasting menus is the opportunity they provide to experience many flavors in one sitting. The first dish carried small bites, each of them delectable — the mushroom pâté was served on a slice of country bread with chives, balsamic reduction, and truffle oil (which, fortunately, wasn't strong; truffles aren't my favorite); the mini ahi poke wanton was a harmonious blend of ahi sashimi, Asian slaw, mango, cilantro, onion, teriyaki glaze, and avocado; and the squash blossoms were crusted with panko crumbs, filled with herb goat cheese, and placed atop a lightly sweet and savory tomato coulis.

The next plate featured the contrasting "shrimp Portofino" (a grilled jumbo shrimp served on crisped slices of Yukon gold

potato, over which some lemon garlic sauce was drizzled) and the foreign sounding "bobotie." My man, David, had heard of the traditional South African dish, but this was the first time he'd had a chance to try it, and the first I'd heard of it. We voiced our curiosity as to why such an exotic item was on the menu and learned that one of the owners was from South Africa. A sort of casserole. the bobotie is traditionally spiced minced meat with an egg-based topping — this one was spiced ground lamb with peas, carrots, and bechamel sauce, served with jasmine rice with raisins and mango chutney.

David loved his bobotic so much, I felt obligated to give him the rest of mine. I was saving room for dessert, particularly the "chocolate French toast sandwich," which was well worth the wait. I have no images of dessert because it disappeared before I

remembered my camera.

Because we so enjoyed the tasting, David and I returned a few weeks later to try out the dinner menu. I wish I had been warned about the portion size — unlike the delightfully dainty-tasting dinner, the serving sizes on a normal night were more fit for Big Bird than Mr. Finch. For example, when I ordered the squash-blossom appetizer, rather than the two I expected, I received four of the cheese-filled, panko-crusted treats. Whereas the one squash blossom from the tasting night had been served on a spoonful of tomato coulis, the appetizer portion came with an entire bowl of it. It was as tasty as I'd remembered, but overwhelming. After one, it just becomes heavy.

David was excited to get the bobotic again, but he suffered the same fate — the portion was huge. I ended up taking the most of my entrée home. I ordered the "meat and potatoes," or "naturally raised Angus filet mignon," which was served atop broccolini, grilled tomato, and

"Finch's scalloped potatoes." The potatoes were incredibly rich — they were smothered in a creamy cheese sauce. I'd filled up on the squash blossoms, so I only made it a few bites into the entrée, which was as generous a portion as the appetizers.

We had plenty of leftovers for lunch the next day. Next time, we plan to bring friends, so we can sample not just more of the menu items, but also more of the interesting wines on offer (such as the Esk Valley sauvignon blanc from New Zealand, which had a surprising and pleasant jalapeño note)

#### New menu at Imig's Bar and Kitchen

Imig's Kitchen and Bar at the Lafayette Hotel (2232 El Cajon Boulevard, 619-780-0358) has been steadily goofing with their menu since I first went there last fall. For a while, they served a modified bistro menu of smaller plates and reserved entrées. It

was a little all over the place and stronger as a happy-hour distraction than as a dinner destination. Sadly, long gone were the eggplant fries that captivated my attention and for which I returned at one point, only to have my hopes crushed.

Now, it looks like Imig's has changed their game yet again with a new menu. It's (significantly) more expensive, but much more of a proper dinner menu at the same time.

Small plates and starters have crept up in price to the \$7-\$13 range, which takes them further from the domain of bar snacks. Steamed clams in a sofrito sauce, grilled shrimp with Humboldt Fog cheese, and portobello mushroom polenta are almost meals in their own right.

The selection of entrées had greater focus and involvement, which came at a higher price. Some dishes — like the individual "pot roast" or the grilled skirt steak with succotash, collards, and pan gravy — edged up against the \$20 mark just without

breaking it. "Old school" meatloaf (\$15.50) received a generous amount of zesty, housemade ketchup and gravy made with red ale. A brief encounter with a saute pan gave the slices of meatloaf a delightful crispiness. Potatoes and carrots on the side were appropriately old-school.

The zealously named "4-hour beer-braised pork shoulder" (\$16) tasted more of alternating melting and crispy fat than beer. The huge hunks of pork lay surrounded by sweet potatoes and fried plantains with some fresh arugula composing a raft above the thick, sweet sauce.

There were definitely some soul-food influences on the new menu: the collards and succotash on the steak and the sweet, almost candied flavors in the pork shoulder. But Imig's new menu — with pot roast, chicken and dumplings, and meatloaf — really pays homage to mid-century American cooking more than anything else. Considering the location in the Lafayette Hotel, with the pictures of early-Hollywood types on the walls, it fits.

French and Italian's a cocktail my bro has always ordered with great bluster. I've even come to like it. A lot, when I can get it.

So, two minutes later, we're heading in with the crowds to the mighty hotel, skirting around it and down to the seaside gardens.

Lord. Haven't been here for four years, must be. That time I lucked out and found José Palma, who's a legend among barmen. Not many cocktails he doesn't know. And, ves, he knew what a French and Italian was. And, miracle! There he is, right behind the bar. I have three words.

"French and Italian?"

It takes him a moment. "Of course," he says.

"And ginger ale," says Carla. "Thanks for asking," she hisses

"Sweetheart, I was just about to...got caught up in the French and Italian thing..."

"Of course," José says again and disappears back inside to the main bar.

"You'll pay, of course," Carla says as we sit down under a heater. "We are going to have a snack."

Man, I'm gonna be eaten alive. A snack here is like a three-course dinner at Denny's, cost-wise

But here is the surprising thing. Hidden among the \$40 steaks, is a little line of "sides," \$7 each. Fork-crushed potatoes, green asparagus, sautéed snap peas, roasted mushrooms, and charred Brussels sprouts, my new go-to side.

"Can we just have a side?" I ask the waitress.

"Of course," she says.

"With bread?"

"We can get you bread."

Result: I have this little triangle of heaven to sip — warm, aromatic, with sweet red vermouth (Italian), dry white vermouth (French), and a splash of gin and a slice of lemon to add tang. Carla's ginger ale looks pretty cool with the setting sun's rays shining through, too.

José — not José Palma brings our plates.

My sprouts, with little baguettes and butter, are crunchy, carbony, beautiful. Quite a lot on the oval plate.

Plus, Carla's 'shrooms mix well with them. They're lush and garlicky. Bit of thyme in there, too.

We eat like parolees who know they've gotta get back to the real world.

But here, kids play on the lawn, a whole ring of people sit like us, looking out to ol' Huey, sinking off Point Loma.

We take bets on what the bill's going to be.

"Thirty-five dollars," says Carla, and you know what? She's right on the button. Have to tip, of course, so make that \$40 when all's said and done.

"Think of it this way," she says. "It's like Danny's, right? We're just missing the french fries."

a song, ban an artist, or they might quit Slacker entirely in a fit of disdain. "It happens. What if, for example, we play a Billy Joel song at the wrong time and a Billy Joel hater hears it? We may lose them forever."

Slacker was founded in 2006 in Rancho Bernardo. The service offers customizable curated channels, news, and sports talk, and both free and subscription-based streaming. Isquith says all the traditional pop-music charts are likewise based on reported sales or spins that say nothing about how engaged a listener may or may not be. "We're just trying to lead the conversation with more talk about listener engagement and less talk about spins as a way of measuring."

Slacker will publish Slacker EQ Top 40 charts on their blog. The data are revealing unexpected results: "For example, we're seeing country artists performing as well as Rihanna." Naturally, a Slacker EQ Top 40 channel is in the works, but for all of the research metrics that have gone into it, the station's music direction sounds a lot like the Boss Radio of old.

"The science says we can play Tim McGraw and Justin Timberlake on the same station. We're going to do just that," Isquith says, "and hope it works out."



#### Something in the air.




given away at the air-guitar competition."

My friend and ex-bandmate from the New Archaic, Joe Harrison, helped arrange the horn parts, and the phone as a logo and branding shtick for a few reasons. I came across three old gramophones at a rummage sale that I use onstage as a cool visual. They're old-school looking and kinda match the inspiration and vibe of the music. Plus, since the instrumentation includes

a four-piece horn section, the horn of the gramophone is a good representation of that."

Shaw has booked two release parties for the CD, with the first taking place June 27 at the Belly Up in Solana Beach. "This one will be a big production with a full band, including a horn section and gospel backing singers Voices of Prayze, who have sung with Jason Mraz and James Morrison."

An all-ages edition happens in Normal Heights on July 12 at Lestat's. "That's my home turf. The show will be a mix of solo acoustic and electric band music." And lest anyone feel ripped off after the more elaborate Solana Beach shindig, "The gospel singers will be included."

and "the band not the man" **Dan Padilla**, these'd be the sets to see Thursday night, SD.... Otherwise, you got Wesley Eisold's dark-wave **Cold Cave** at the Void with sonic experimentalist Boyd Rice.. Texas death-metal by **Devour the Unborn** darkens the Tower with Gutsaw...and "acid-blues" group Requiem for the Rockets lands at Tin Can Ale House after La Font (L.A.) and Muscle Beech [sic].

**Friday** 

Singer/songer/guitarist and one-time Plimsoul Peter Case plays NoPark hot spot Bar Pink Friday night. Mr. Case is half of that '70s new-pop duo with Paul Collins that gave the world the Nerves, the Breakaways, and the Beat. These days Case plays the solo-folkie circuit with indie-cred intact. . The material is rich and comes with Grammy guarantees (Let Us Now Praise Sleepy John). Bootcut boogie band **Deep Ellum** and Twin Cities trio Gasoline Silver ("subterranean wordplay scored with electro-psych panoramas and biker-movie guitars") open the show.... Loose Snakes slither in first The Tin Can's Monday-night Country Club has that country-fried crooner/guitarist **Bill Cardinal** this week...while Casbah's Anti-Monday team sets up this month's resident alt-pop act the Steelwells with boy-girl garage-rock band the New Kinetics.

moving to Borrego. You guys notice that Casa del Zorro's reopened — and affordable? We gotta get some shows going on out there! Somebody look into that and report back here.



"It was a golden era worldwide, quite simply, because of Edward Van Halen. Personally, I found the '80s to be artistically shallow and dreadful on the fashion side."

"I couldn't understand it then, and I understand it even less now, but something tells me if chicks didn't dig it, it would've never escalated to the embarrassing level it did. And

## WHAT DID YOU DO IN THE YEARS FOLLOWING THE DEMISE OF STRAITA HEAD?

"Graduated from Musicians Institute, performed in the band Ellis, studied classical guitar in the style of Fernando Sor, taught guitar at Albert's Music City, and performed at the Tommy Bolin tribute festival with Glenn Hughes, formerly of Deep Purple. I also wrote and recorded the song 'Big Sky' with Glenn.

## WHAT VISION DID YOU HAVE FOR THE FUTURE OF THE BRETT ELLIS BAND?

"After Guiltlessly Free, I knew it was time to start performing, so I assembled my dream rhythm section with Rick Nash on bass and Calvin Lakin on the drums to create what I consider a first-rate power trio."

"Without question. I was so inspired by the way the three of us sound together that I wrote and recorded *Monkey Brains* and our new release, *Zero*, in short order. We're finishing up an all-blues album entitled *Blues Is Everything*."

#### Social Club, of North Park, has invented a new genre they call "pull."

"It's a really bad name," says John Levan. He fronts the band, writes most of the lyrics, and sings most of the songs. "I like the idea that music pulls everybody together," he says, "but it's kinda tough to say, It doesn't roll off the tongue." Social Club came about in 2011. "I moved to San Diego a while back from the East Coast and I didn't have any connections. I found a band online — Boombox Renaissance. a hip-hop group. All due respect, they're a great group, but I knew that wasn't my main focus." When Levan left Boombox Renaissance, he took bassist James Spratley with him. Soon

after, they got a drummer, Jeffrey Litzman, and Thea Tochihara came aboard on kevs An EP was released. A label deal with Pacific Records was consummated. The only job left was to push "pull."

So far, the push is paying off; it's been a good 2013 for the band. Gamma Rays came out early this year: then. Social Club won MOFILM's Take Your Band to Texas video competition and got a slot in music-industry showcase South by Southwest.

A lot of the success, Levan thinks, is because Social Club does have a social club. "We like to interact with people and make it more than a show — a party," he says. "Get 'em involved somehow." We talk about the near-useless simplicity that marketing on social media is fast becoming, an arena where he says appearances don't mean a thing. "You can get a ton of people to 'like' you on Facebook," Levan says, "but sometimes people use media

as a substitute for getting out and actually doing it." He laughs, but it is a wry laugh, "Every now and then, you gotta get up and go to an actual show."

No electronics on this album (another shearing), but I'll take Evyind Kang on violin and viola any day, not to

mention Marc Ribot and Beth Orton's other funky friends making...okay, not funk, but chamber-pop marching along sometimes on Brian Blade's martial-marching beats. Orton's voice always struck me as Joan Baez with the almost-hurtful

purity sanded down just that crucial hair; here, she gets to chase herself up and down, singing, Hello, how are you, I am everywhere, I am everything. Childlike wonder stopping short of childish indulgence. A gentle pantheism.

And while I adored her electronics, the organic vibe reflected back and forth between words and tunes seems less smooth, more of a purposeful push. Worthy purpose: "You want to learn the trick to turn/ What's not so pretty/ Into something more beautiful/ It's the same place/ That I learned to turn/ What could be sorrow/ Into some kind of mercy." The thankfulness for life comes at the end of the album. The above comes from roughly the first third. So, the problems of living precede the thankfulness. But, then (again), that's life.

#### **Ladies and** gentlemen, the **Rolling Stones!**

The Rolling Stones continue to defy the odds with their ability to turn back the hands of time. After

50 years, they continue to fill arenas, ignite crowds, and deliver satisfaction night after night.

Mick Jagger was relentless as he swaggered around the tongue-shaped stage at Staples Center fueled with nonstop energy throughout the 23-song set. Alongside Jagger was the "human riff," Keith Richards, the guitarist who dreamed

the opening salvo of "Satisfaction" and so many other indelible Stones songs. Using his famous open-G tuning, he launched into one famous riff after another. For two and a half hours the band (including Ron-

nie Wood and Charlie

Watts) unleashed an arsenal of rock classics, including "Gimme Shelter," "Paint It Black," "Brown Sugar," and "Jumping Jack Flash."

While the majority of the set leaned on their classics, two rarities were sprinkled in: a deep cut from the 1968 Beggars Banquet album, "Factory Girl," and the title track from 1980's Emotional Rescue.

The high point came as Mick Taylor joined them for a three-guitar onslaught during a blistering, hypnotizing version of "Midnight Rambler "





# **Anything for a story**

No matter what these proto-fascists do, even the cleansing of farce can't redeem them.

en Hecht was a writer's writer. He won the first Academy Award for a screenplay (*Underworld*, 1927). He rewrote the first nine reels of *Gone with the Wind* in seven days. He wrote 35 books and scripted/doctored 70–90 movies. As a journalist in Chicago, he "haunted streets, whore-

houses, police stations, courtrooms, theater stages, jails, saloons, slums, madhouses, fires, murders, riots, banquet halls and bookshops." In

1928, Hecht and Charles MacArthur lambasted yellow journalism in *The Front Page* (1928).

That play's most striking feature, still, is astonishingly sharp and funny street dialogue. The authors keep the whole stage alive with a fluid score of tones and moods. There are times when the rapid exchanges have the syncopation and improvisations of jazz. In fact, you could call *The Front Page* THE Jazz Age comedy.

Howard Hawks made it a movie — *His Girl Friday* (1940), which Hecht cowrote with Charles Lederer (who also penned *The Thing From Another World*, in 1952, another feast of dialogue). The biggest change: they converted the male lead, Hildy Johnson, into a woman. In both versions, we see little of the world outside except for the gallows, where Earl Williams, alleged Communist, will soon be hanged. He shot an African-American policeman and has been railroaded to the noose. The reporters say he's guilty. Their publishers tell them so and measure the "truth" in papers sold. Earl is the kind of "celebrity criminal" decried in Bob Fosse's *Chicago*, which pays irate homage to the original.

The only reporter who might ask the tough questions ran off. Hildy Johnson, alpha female and one of America's best journalists, has had it with her editor/ex-husband, Walter Burns, an alpha-to-the-centauri male who will do anything to get a story. Hildy returns, engaged to a momma's boy. She flips the press room, and Chicago, upsidedown, and rakes the muck from both.

John Guare's adaptation resets the play to August 31, 1939, the day Germany staged a fake attack on itself, blamed Poland, and invaded the next morning. In effect, Guare perches an ominous cloud — the darkest of the 20th Century — over an erstwhile "screwball comedy." In a way, the choice recalls G.B. Shaw's *Heartbreak House*, where an aristocratic family cavorts and bumbles on the eve of World War I. But the world-changing event weighs heavily on Friday's characters. It makes Hildy's harrowing of corrupt Chicago journalism seem almost insignificant compared to Hitler's vow to harrow the world with Panzer strikes, V-2 rockets, and genocide.

Guare inserts revealing attitudes about the upcoming war: most of the reporters are pro-Hitler. Though true historically, it yanks them from the confines of a comedy. The background often competes for center stage. No matter what these proto-fascists do, even the cleansing of farce can't redeem them.

This is John Guare, however, whose plays don't get produced enough in San Diego (*Landscape of the Body*, *House of Blue Leaves*, *Six Degrees of Separa-*

tion). What he does brilliantly — though maybe too brilliantly for today's tweeted attention spans — is write dialogue that crackles like strings of firecrackers. Though he's less successful at moving people on and off stage (a mob will conveniently disappear while the next scene's people magically arrive in the same

instant). The script matches Hecht and Lederer's knack for making clipped speeches reveal character and propel scenes forward.

Except for a majority of speeches spoken on the same blaring level, director Christopher Ashley's staging shows an appreciation for the period and flare of the piece. As do Paul Tazewell's appropriately bulky, squared-off costumes, Mark Bennett's original music and sound, and David Lander's lightbulb-era lighting.

Robert Brill's micro-realistic set, the glassed-in pressroom, is as intricate as the dialogue. An added touch: it mirrors the corruption it contains. It's so aged and grimy you can almost smell the mold. The playhouse named Brill — former scenic genius for Sledgehammer Theatre — its 2013–2014 Artist-in-Residence.

Also in the "It's About Time" category: Ashley cast many local actors! And they deliver: Kevin Koppman-Gue, Mike Sears, Dale Morris, Steve Gunderson (wonderful as Pinkus, the timid nobody who refuses to cave in), Jonathan McMurtry (a hoot as a lost priest), and James Saba (recently named new head of SD Junior Theatre — he's perfect for that post).

Mary Beth Peil makes Mrs. Baldwin the motherin-law from hell (she's convinced that Jane Austen ruined civilization). Donald Sage Mackay's Bruce Baldwin gets caught in a trap. To be funny, he must be a right-wing wimp, which Baldwin does quite well.

But what could Hildy possibly see in him? Even when emotionally distraught or on the rebound? The persistent question detracts from Jenn Lyon's otherwise top-notch Hildy. She's brassy, dead certain, and disillusioned. And blind?

As Walter Burns, Douglas Sills hauls large portions of the play on his back. Even though the character is one-note insistent, Sills makes Burns's desperate banter a verbal tour de force.

The script wants to be one, too. It starts with a home run (the original play and film). But Guare tries to make it do so many things — like touching all the bases at once — it's a forced tour de force. ■

By now, the tale of an otherworldly father fighting to spare his super-tot from cataclysmic uncertainty — all the while scratching an itch to propagate his race — has been sown deep in the furrows of America's collective consciousness. Rather than commencing an adventure — preferably ones not involving a school bus in peril or bad-mannered oafs getting their longawaited comeuppance — we open on Krypton with Jor-El (Russell Crowe) once again preparing to act as his son's prerecorded "How To" manual from beyond.

Henry Cavill is the first Superman to have a membership at Krypton's 24

Hour Fitness and Amy Adams is Lois, the latest in a long line of Lanes. As evidenced in their Dark Knight trilogy, the team of Goyer and Nolan never were big on romance. Lois is wise to Clark's secret ID almost from the getgo. The dynamic screenwriting duo

> effectively kneecap the mystery and romance in favor of a Lois who

acts more like Superman's agent than his love interest.

Snyder tries to keep it fresh by juggling the chronology of the familiar opening passages. Never before have we experienced what it must be like for young Kent to come to grips with new-found powers of super-hearing and x-ray vision. In this director's universe, that translates into doubling the imagery and rattling the camera.

General Zod failed to connect with fanbovs when first he graced the pages of Adventure Comics back in 1961. It wasn't until 1978, when Warner Bros. introduced the character to movie audiences, that his reputation began to rise. As one of the last surviving Kryptonians, Terence Stamp endowed the good General with haughty ele-

gance; his purring arrogance suggesting a blueblood living every day of his indomitable life as if it were his first.

assigned to infiltrate the domestic organization that gives the film its name. The group does punishment-fits-the-crime work; during the opening credits, they flood the home of an oil exec with the same crude that his company spilled all over a coastline.

Matthew Lickona: This is the second film you've made in collaboration with Brit Marling, after *Sound of My Voice*. Tell me about working together.

Zal Batmanglij: Brit and I met as undergraduates at Georgetown — she was a freshman and I was a junior. Creative ambitions were not at the top of most people's lists — people wanted to be bankers or lawyers or whatever. My best friend Mike Cahill and I made two short films together, and we submitted them to the first-ever Georgetown film festival, and we won. Brit came up and asked if she could work with us. We've been making movies, by hook or by crook, ever since.

ML: Any details on those hooks and crooks?

ZB: I went to graduate school for directing at AFI in L.A., and I wanted to be a director. Brit wanted to be an actress. But it's hard to break into both of those things. So we taught ourselves to write; it took about four years. Four years in, we wrote *Sound of My Voice*, and very quickly after that, we wrote *The East*. They're both about people trying to get in — which was exactly what we were trying to do.

ML: What were you trying to do with *The East*?

ZB: We were really inspired by the thrillers of the '70s, things like *The Parallax View* and *All the President's Men*. We wanted to do something similar, something that made you think, but was also kind of thrilling. The film was inspired by a journey we'd taken in 2009 through "the underworld of America." We lived with different anarchist squats, anarchist farms, freegan collectives, direct action groups...

ML: Why did the cult element come in?

ZB: I don't like to call *The East* a cult. We explored cults in *Sound of My Voice*. I think cults have an underlying spiritual quality. I think *The East* 

is political.

ML: But it feels culty at the outset, what with the talk of how the leader is waking people up, and the people wearing masks around the fire, and the humiliating initiation ritual... Of course, just a few minutes later, people are taking a vote about what to do, so it does get political.

ZB: That shift was on purpose. When we first entered into these groups, it was a shock — it felt so alien. We felt so other. We wanted both Sarah and the audience to feel that and then acclimate. We were trying to dramatize acclimation.

ML: Speaking of things getting political, *The East* is a political action group, but the motivations for their particular actions are highly personal. It brings things closer to the form of a revenge story.

ZB: A revenge story is a lot more exciting and emotional.

ML: But it clouds the question of justice when it comes to these things they're doing

AB: It does. That's the world we live in. I think the political is personal and the personal is political. You've got gay people leading the charge for gay rights. Straight allies are important, but I think everything that's truly effective politically comes from a place of personal experience.

ML: And since the trees can't rise up for themselves, you have these environmentalists...

ZB: It's funny that we don't see ourselves as part of the environment. We're organic matter, born and bred of this earth.

ML: Still, human drama feels closer to us than environmental drama.

ZB: So, you've just answered your question about why we made things personal. We wanted to make something more resonant for people. I think people are feeling frustrated these days. All the things in the movie are based on reality — the drug company is real. The drug is real — there really is an antibiotic on the market that can cause people to end up in wheelchairs.

ML: About that drug. Somebody in the film asks, "How did they even

let this stuff on the market?" It's almost as if *The East* should be going after the government for approving it.

ZB: I don't think the government is that powerful anymore. The drug companies fund the studies; the FDA funds very few on its own. The drug is approved based on a study done by the drug company. If it takes six weeks for side effects to kick in, they're not going to include that.

ML: Okay, let's talk about the scene where *The East* plays spin the bottle. I confess, I wrote in my notes, "Hippiedippie." It really took things out of the political realm you mentioned. It was touching and sweet, but it was also...

ZB: Twee? One of the things that fascinated me on the road, especially among the anarchists, was their desire for everything to be militant and hardcore. I think they'll have a similar concern. But I'm fascinated by the soft. It's very dangerous, because when you remove irony — and I'm really against irony — it can border on twee. But that scene is one of the few things that we actually experienced on the road. When you remove watching movies, reading the newspaper, smart phones, the internet, and music, after about six weeks, if you play a game of spin the bottle, it's so exciting and intimate and thrilling. A kiss from a stranger was like What It Was All About. What's funny is that when we tested the movie, that was our lowest testing scene, and it was also our highest testing scene.

#### INTERVIEW WITH THE EAST STAR AND COWRITER BRIT MARLING

Matthew Lickona: Tell me about Sarah's naivete

Brit Marling: I thought of her as a thoroughbred racehorse. She's very well trained, and she gets a lot of pleasure out of just running the race. But she just sees what's directly in front of her — the goal of winning. And then somebody rips the blinders off, and she becomes aware that she's running a race, that people are betting and making money off of it, and she's just running in circles. She sees the pasture beyond the fence, and the question is, "Can you jump the fence and find a new way to live?"

ML: But even after the blinders come off, she's making speeches about how the food she finds in a dumpster is good food, and that's evidence that the system is broken. Stores have to throw food away so that customers don't buy it and get sick. There's a law, and the law is there because somebody got sick and sued.

BM: That's the great problem. None of it is wrong, exactly; it's just also not right. The first time I went dumpster diving, I was, like, "This is ridiculous." But then you get all this packaged bread and peanut butter and bananas and apples. I would eat three vegan meals a day out of a dumpster at the squat that were as good as anything I've ever eaten out of a Whole Foods. I understand the law being there to protect people from getting sick, but you feel like there's a glitch in the matrix. Everything feels a little bit off, and how do you solve the problem without unraveling the whole system? It's hard.

ML: This gets at the difficulty of making an environmental movie. Things keep coming back to humanity being its own enemy because it has desires it can't control. How do you make a movie in which humanity is the villain?

BM: I think it's the difficulty of the time we're living in. It's all gray. There's no single antagonist. You can't even point at the corporation and say, "This is all bad." There's also good. Think of the drugs that have been developed to prolong the lives of people with HIV/ AIDS. But there's a complicated thing that happens when profit — making more money next quarter than this quarter — is the mechanism driving society and culture. A lot of great things happen, but there are a lot of casualties. This may not be true at all, but I feel like knowledge is the mechanism for cure — looking at things and talking about solutions, as opposed to not looking. And I feel like modern culture is designed to keep you from looking. Zal and I certainly don't feel like we know any of the answers to the problems. But if we don't even ask the questions, that seems to be the greatest danger.

42 — Television veteran Chadwick Boseman gives a fine, canny performance as Jackie Robinson, the man who broke Major League Baseball's color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947. Well, except for when he talks to his wife and infant son: then, writer-director Brian Helgeland's script drives him into speechmaking about the interior life he is otherwise allowed to convey through expression and action. And sometimes, through *inaction*: as Dodgers owner Branch Rickey tells him, success will require Robinson to be like Jesus and turn the other cheek. (Harrison Ford's growlyjowly performance as Rickey does nothing



to obscure an excellent character: a man whose motivations include greed, devotion to the game, and a genuine strain of Christianity.) The story isn't much more than a hit parade of "Shut up, racist" moments — Alan Tudyk's opposing manager just oozes with venomous talk — but its blunt force is enough to get the job done. 2013. — M.L. \*\* (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

After Earth — The single star is because the setup is fine — almost great, even. Estranged father and son (Will and Jaden Smith) survive a crash landing on a hostile planet. Dad's injured, and so it's the son who must retrieve an emergency beacon from a distant chunk of wreckage. Technology will keep them in contact, and allow Dad to see what son sees. Time is against them, along with everything else. The elder Smith assumes an affecting stoicism; he's a hero because he doesn't feel fear, but he doesn't appear to feel much else, either. So much for the good stuff. The rest is absurd emotional outbursts from the unready younger Smith, absurd anthropology (fear is not, in fact, a choice; the response to fear is a choice), absurd anthropomorphism (Mama bird!), absurd expositional visions, and Signs-style alien hijinks from director M. Night Shyamalan. A dimly shot, poorly scored misfire. 2013. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

**Before Midnight** — Late in the proceedings of this, the third installment of Richard Linklater's relationship gabfest, Jesse (Ethan Hawke) gets a mid-argument chance to make a list of his beloved Celine's (July Delpy) flaws. "Well, for starters, you're fucking crazy," he begins — and gets no further. But sometimes, a one-item list is enough. It's Celine's insanity — or at least, her panic over losing herself to the roles of supportive lover and loving mother — that prevents Before Midnight from becoming a detailed, scenic, static portrait of midlife. Aging and raging, she's the motor that makes this a movie. It's been nine years since last we saw the couple; now, they're finishing a summer vacation in Greece. Jesse has just sent his son back to his ex-wife in the States, and he (understandably) wants to be closer to the boy. But Celine has just been offered a job in France. Cue the verbal fireworks. 2013. - M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE -SEE SHOWTIMES)



The Call — Academy Award-winning former Bond girl Halle Berry wagers her reputation on a shameless "teen-in-trunk' exploitation drama, playing a veteran LAPD 911 operator plagued with guilt after her accidental redial alerts a killer to the victim's whereabouts. Naturally, she gets a second shot at the same killer, and as implausible as it may sound, once the kidnapper deposits victim number two (Abigail Breslin) inside his torture shack, Jordan kicks the crummy dust of Command Central off her shoes and gets in on the action. For you drooling pervs in the audience, 16-year-old Little Miss Sunshine spends the third act clad in nothing more than jeans and a turquoise pushup bra. I was willing to laugh at The Call right up until the finale, when the exhausted victims miraculously find the strength to become victimizers and turn on their assailant. As pandering as it is ghastly. 2013. — S.M. ● (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

**The East** — Sarah (star and cowriter Brit Marling) is a rising star at a private espionage agency who gets assigned to infiltrate the titular domestic protest organization. The East does punishment-fits-the-crime work: flooding the home of an oil exec with the same crude that his company spilled all over a coastline, etc. But deep cover work has a way of clouding perspective, especially when the targets are painfully earnest (Ellen Page) and brutally handsome (Alexander Skarsgård). Marling, together with director and cowriter Zal Batmanglii, works hard to give us a world where the waters are not only polluted, but also muddy — the bad guys don't set out to do bad things, and the good guys are driven as much by revenge as a thirst for justice. The laudable point is that things are complicated, and only at the very end do things venture into the realm of (organic) popcorn fantasy. 2013. — M.L. ★★ (LANDMARK HILLCREST)

**Epic** — As Pixar gets digested by Disney, Blue Sky Studios steps up and takes its

shot at the title for innovative animated storytelling. (The CG animation itself is pretty innovative as well, particularly when it comes to water, sunlight, and facial expressions.) The biggest success is at the level of emotion: a teenage girl's alienation from her crackpot father, a leaf-warrior's grief over the loss of his beloved queen, and even a slug's hopeless pining for a pretty girl are handled with surprising deftness. But the story can't match the characters: when your bad guy's motivation is an arbitrary desire to upset the balance of nature, you've got a problem. The circle of life doesn't really allow for the binary struggle between good and evil. Director Chris Wedge sought to turn author William Joyce's source material from "a quaint story" into "a gigantic action-adventure movie," and the stretch marks show. 2013. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Evil Dead — An overexplained nightmare: explanations are what this remake has in place of the anarchic whimsy of the original. Why are the pretty young people going to hang out at a creepy cabin in the woods? Because they're trying to help their friend quit drugs, and this is her childhood getaway. (Drugs are also why they don't believe she's possessed, at least, not at first.) Why do various awful things happen to them (especially the women)? Because there are corresponding pictures in this here book bound in human skin. There's an apocalyptic prophecy in there too, because everybody loves raised stakes. Oh, and also directions for stopping the badness. Fans of the original will nod with recognition (if not necessarily delight), and fans of intense, graphic violence will get their fill. Director Fede Alvarez famously eschewed CGI, and the gore is indeed lovingly handcrafted. There isn't much more to say. 2013. ★ (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)


**Fast & Furious 6** — The cars, they are very pretty. Vin Diesel's voice, it is very gravelly. The Rock, he is very large.



Here, she makes vaguely misanthropic director Noah Baumbach put down his torturer's tools in favor of something positively humane. (Maybe it helped that she co-wrote the screenplay.) Mind you, Baumbach still puts his heroine through her paces: her disappointments on nearly every front — love, money, artistic dreams, even friendship are expressed by her increasingly unsexy living arrangements. (It's New York City, so where you live says even more about who you are than usual.) But the suffering isn't

of the numbing-dumbing variety; instead, it's the thresher that separates the wheat from the chaff. The black-and-white images of the city, the pathology of bad relationships, and Gerwig's awkward glamor will surely recall Woody Allen's *Manhattan*, but then, there are worse things to recall. 2013. — M.L. \*\*\* (LANDMARK HILLCREST; LANDMARK LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

The Great Gatsby — Director Baz Luhrmann finds a suitable subject for the riotous excess of his directorial style in the riotous excess of the Jazz Age. Unfortunately, there's still rather a lot of movie remaining at that point, and the denouement stretches out like a nasty morning after. Luhrmann mostly stays faithful to F. Scott Fitzgerald's famous story of American self-invention and money-based morality, but only mostly. In stressing Gatsby's material greatness, he forgets the parts that make the poor suitor from the Midwest romantic, admirable, tragic, or even touching. We're left with an obsessive, deceptive little crook who is so bent on subjecting the Girl He Couldn't Afford to his own gargantuan self-love that he demands she rewrite her own past for his sake, Ungreat, With Leonardo DiCaprio, Tobey Maguire, Carey Mulligan,

**Kon-Tiki** — Five fair-haired Norwegians and a bald Swedish ethnographer spend 100 days and 5000 miles charting the Pacific on a balsa wood raft to prove right adventurer Thor Heyerdal's (Pål Sverre Hagen) theory that South Americans, not Asians, populated Polynesia. Roadblocks to perfection: a second-act encounter with a shark bordered on Asian splatter, and instead of feeling around for an ending, directorial duo Joachim Rønning and Espen Sandberg might just as easily have put an "Amen" on it with the exquisite, cosmic passage-of-time sequence that marked day 101. Minor gripes aside, this sweeping, well-crafted epic, based on Heyerdal's best-seller, is quick to the helm both on land and sea. Production designer Karl Júlíusson's detailed period recreation of Brooklyn in the '40s and DP Geir Hartly Andreassen's sense of natural light give the finished product a polish that would have quadrupled the film's relatively paltry \$16 million budget had it been shot in the WB water tank. — S.M. \*\*\* (AMC LA JOLLA; LANDMARK HILLCREST; READ-ING GASLAMP)

Love Is All You Need — A Danish cancer patient (Trine Dyrholm) catches her husband diddling a co-worker two days before they're set to leave for their daughter's Italian wedding. A supposedly heartwarming comedy that spends most of its running time garnering uncomfortable laughs off the misfortune of others. North Korean terrorists hold the White House hostage and it's up to Gerard Butler, a disgraced former Secret Service man once assigned to presidential guard duty, to get back inside

1600 Pennsylvania Avenue the hard way and reset the course of history. On the surface. it represents everything contemptible about contemporary cinema - a propagandistic, effects-driven cavalcade of carnage that probably boasts a higher body count than all of George Romero's "living dead" safaris combined — but damn if (for a change) this wasn't an effectively constructed thrill ride I enjoyed hopping. Antoine Fugua directs. With Aaron Eckhart, Morgan Freeman, and Rick Yune. 2013. — S.M. ★★★ (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

Pain & Gain — Oy, Bay! Michael Bay, the Butcher of Burbank, returns, this time with one pound of script in a 20 lb. casing and a refrigerated display case fit to bust with shoulder cut of Mark Wahlberg, prime rib of Anthony Mackie, and filet of Rock. In order to help underwrite their addiction to steroids and dumbbells (and also to impress the bitches), a trio of meathead bodybuilders resorts to a life of crime by kidnapping an unscrupulous Florida businessman (Tony Shalhoub, in a role originally meant for Albert Brooks). Even with a fact-based account to guide them — the film is based on a series of Miami New Times articles the director and his screenwriters still can't fashion a cohesive narrative. It's all flash and no panache as Bay borrows heavily from the Miami Vice playbook of swish-pans, flash frames, and singed color. ees, administrators, and contractors in three South County school districts. Ultimately, 15 trustees, administrators, and contractors were indicted as a result of the proceedings.

In the *U-T* story, Brand told reporter Aaron Burgin that there was too much contractor influence in the district and that three trustees had asked him to go to the president of Seville Group Inc., Rene Flores, for campaign donations. (Seville Group Inc., or SGI, managed the district's \$644 million Proposition O bond until January 2012.)

The U-T reported: "He [Brand] said that within the first six to eight days of his arrival, [Bertha] Lopez, [Pearl] Quiñones, and John McCann asked him to solicit campaign donations from SGI President Rene Flores and Jaime Ortiz, the company's bond manager."

In the grand jury transcripts, deputy district attorney Leon Schorr asked Brand: "Did you ask him [Flores] on behalf of McCann, [Jim] Cartmill, [Arlie] Ricasa, Quiñones, or Lopez for any contributions?" Brand answers: "No. Never."

But in another volume of the transcripts that have been officially released to the public (Brand's were not), Flores tells deputy district attorney Schorr:

"I want to say something very quick. Dr. Brand in December asked me to give an additional \$20,000 to both John McCann and Jim Cartmill and I didn't do it right away during December for tax purposes. And so I didn't do it. So he suspended us [SGI] without any reason...and subsequent to that there's been evaluations done and we have been cleared — my company has been cleared of any wrongdoing."

So it seems there is a contradiction in the sworn statements.

#### A Sunday without The **Californian**

**U-T** discontinues local paper; disappointment and alternatives discussed

For folks in southwestern Riverside County, it was the first Sunday without their local newspaper, The Californian.

With the purchase of the *North County* Times in September 2012, the U-T San Diego also acquired *The Californian*, published for communities in the Murrieta, Temecula, and Wildomar areas. Since September, the *U-T* published a daily local section with community news and sports under The Californian masthead, combined with the regular edition of the *U-T*.

On Tuesday, May 27, U-T San Diego stopped publishing The Californian section. Folks in North San Diego County also lost the last remnant of the former North County *Times* with the disappearance of their "North County Local" section.

Over at Mo's Egg House, a popular breakfast spot on Jefferson Avenue in Temecula, on Sunday morning, June 2, diners Roberta and Barry were reading their home-delivered *U-T*, as they do every Sunday morning. "I miss the first page being local news," said Roberta. "I might as well pick up the New York Times or the L.A. Times."

Down the road at Penfold's Café and Bakery, retired Marine Jake had just sat down and opened his *U-T*. He said *The Californian* was the first paper he picked up when he moved to Temecula 25 years ago. "It was all the news I needed." Jake said he'll switch to the Press-*Enterprise*, a Riverside-based paper that caters to all of Riverside County.

At the 7-Eleven off Highway 79 South/ Temecula Parkway, clerk Navi said the Sunday *U-T* seems to still be selling. Next door at Carl's Jr., the L.A. Times and Press-Enterprise racks were empty by 8:00 a.m.; several copies of the *U-T* were still available.





It took complaints from many people and organizations in Ocean Beach, but the parking lot and shrubbery surrounding the now-shuttered Apple Tree market was trimmed and weeded so it could open today, June 1.

Mark Fitzgerald, area supervisor of Laz/ Sunset Parking Services, was there on May 31 with his workers, installing a new parking pay station and getting rid of the unwanted vegetation. Fitzgerald said 77 much-needed parking spaces would be available on June 1. During the next week or so, workers will repaint the parking lines and that will open up about a dozen more spaces.

There is still no word on what will become of the former Apple Tree, though several months ago there was talk of another discount supermarket chain moving in.

# Why's that helicopter over my

Police chief talks crime and the city's notification system

At the May 28 La Mesa City Council meeting, police chief Ed Aceves delivered his quarterly crime report.

He said the number of violent incidents dropped from 54 committed during the first quarter of 2012 to 39 incidents during the first three months of this year. The total is "the lowest it's been in a number of years. That's the good news," said Aceves. "The problem is our property crime is going up. We really need help from all of our residents in protecting their property."

Aceves attributed the increase in property crimes to the rise in general theft, which jumped from 245 in the first quarter of 2012 to 347 during the first three months of this year. He attributed the 36 percent increase in these crimes to factors such as people leaving valuables in "in plain view" in vehicles or leaving vehicles unlocked.

Also at the meeting, councilman Ernest

Ewin and mayor Art Madrid talked with Aceves about Nixle, a notification system the city has used for several years. People sign up and receive email or mobile messages about criminal activity, emergencies, and street repairs.

"I enjoy knowing what's going on, especially when the [sheriff's] helicopter is sitting over my house," said Ewin. During the hearing, he held up his phone and said there was a 6:04 p.m. notice about the police and a sheriff's helicopter looking for a parolee at large in the area around 69th Street and Suffolk Drive.

Aceves said that Nixle "saved many calls" to the police from residents asking about the helicopter in their neighborhood. He noted that the alerts are sent to 1200 registrants, an increase of 1000 people since last year.





#### **LEAD STORY**

- One of the many decisions greeting Pope Francis, as Salon.com pointed out, is whether to officially recognize a Patron Saint of Handgunners — as urged by a U.S. organization of activists for more than 20 years. According to legend, St. Gabriel Possenti rescued an Italian village from a small band of pillagers (and perhaps rapists) in the 19th Century by shooting at a lizard in the road, killing it with one shot, which supposedly so terrified the bandits that they fled. No humans were harmed, activists now point out, signifying the handgun was obviously a force for good. The head of the St. Gabriel Possenti Society has noted that, however far-fetched the "lizard incident" may be, it was rarely questioned until U.S. antigun activists gained strength in the 1980s.

#### **Can't Possibly Be True**

- Though Americans may feel safe that the Food and Drug Administration approves a drug only for certain specific uses, the U.S. Court of Appeals in New York ruled in December that drug company salespeople have a First Amendment right to claim that drugs approved for only one use can be marketed for nonapproved uses, as well. Doctors and bioethicists seemed outraged, according to the Los Angeles Times, gen-

erally agreeing with a University of Minnesota professor who called the decision "a complete disgrace. What this basically does is destroy drug regulation in the United States."

— Denials of disability allowances in the town of Basildon, England, near London, are handled at the Acorn House courthouse, on the fourth floor, where afflicted people who believe they were wrongly rejected for benefits must present their appeals. However, in November, zealous government safety wardens, concerned about fire-escape dangers, closed off the fourth floor to wheelchair-using people. Asked one woman, turned away in early February, "Why are they holding disability tribunals in a building disabled people aren't allowed in?" (In February, full access resumed.)

- Among the helpful civic classes the city government in Oakland, Calif., set up earlier this year for its residents was one on how to pick locks (supposedly to assist people who had accidentally locked themselves out of their homes), and lockpicking kits were even offered for sale after class. Some residents were aghast, as the city had seen burglaries increase by 40 percent in 2012. Asked one complainer, "What's next? The fundamentals of armed robbery?" (In February, Mayor Jean Quan apologized and canceled the class.)

- In February, the North Carolina House of Representatives Rules Committee took the unusual step of pre-emptively burying a bill to legalize prescription marijuana (which 18 states so far have embraced). WRAL-TV (Raleigh-Durham) reported Rep. Paul Stam's explanation: Committee members were hearing from so many patients and other constituents (via phone calls and emails) about the importance of medical marijuana to them that the representatives were feeling "harassed."

#### Inexplicable

 Two teachers and three student teachers at a Windsor, Ontario, elementary school somehow thought it would be a neat prank on their eighthgraders to make them think their class trip would be to Florida's Disney World, and they created a video and PowerPoint presentation previewing the excursion. The kids' exhilaration lasted only a few days, when they were informed that plans had changed and that they would instead be visiting a local bowling alley. Furthermore, the teachers captured the students' shock on video, presumably to repeatedly re-enjoy their prank. (When the principal found out, she apologized, disciplined the teachers, and arranged a class trip to Niagara Falls.)

#### **Unclear on the Concept**

- Imprisoned British computer hacker Nicholas Webber, 21, serving time for computer fraud, hacked into the mainframe at his London prison after officials allowed him to take a computer class. Like most prisons, the Isis facility attempts to rehabilitate inmates with classes to inspire new careers, but apparently no one made the connection between the class and Webber's crime. (One prison staff member involved in the class was fired.)

- Dustin Coyle, 34, was charged with domestic abuse in Oklahoma City in January, but it was hardly his fault, he told police. His ex-girlfriend accused him (after she broke up with him) of swiping her cat and then roughing it up, punching her, elbowing her, and sexually assaulting her. Coyle later lamented to police that she and he were supposed to get married, but for some reason she changed her mind. "If she would just marry me, that would solve everything," but, according to the police report, he would settle for her being his girlfriend again — or a one-


