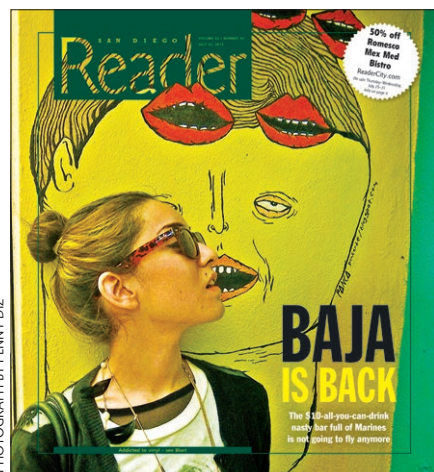

Does the city hate protesters?

Animal-rights activists sue police

San Diego — The City Attorney's Office appears to be getting tired of all those pesky demonstrators, whether it's over slogans in children's washable chalk or in the newest assault against animal-rights activists protesting the treatment of animals used in the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus at the Valley View Casino Center (Sports Arena).

According to a July 16 lawsuit filed by animal-rights attorney Bryan Pease on behalf of the Animal Protection and Rescue League, police officers continually threaten demonstrators with arrest, jail time, and fines for picketing and passing out leaflets when the circus is in town.

In 2012, a protester was hauled to jail. The City Attorney's Office has since decided to file charges against her in court.

The complaint alleges that police officers and owners of the arena are apt to turn a blind eye to some illegal activities but are quick to target peaceful protests on their property.

"The Valley View Casino and Hotel Center operators and owners permit multiple legal and illegal sales of tickets to events to be sold on their property or turn a blind eye for such activity, permit people to 'tailgate' on their property, and generally congregate around their property regardless of whether such people are ticket holders or intend to go to the event."

The demonstrators object to what they say is cruel and inhumane treatment of baby elephants and other circus animals. They say their best chance at informing the public is through picketing and passing out leaflets directly to zoo-going families.

"Distributing literature, which includes photographs of baby elephants being restrained, the use of bull hooks on elephants, the captivity of tigers in small cages, are more effective [ways] of educating patrons of the circus than waving signs and yelling."

Activists say the San Diego Municipal Code allows for peaceful protest activities to take place on the property of privately owned businesses when that business is open to the public and the protesters do not harass patrons.

Protest over Issa's "wasteful" border plan

Group protests Border Patrol bill outside congressman's office

Vista — About 70 people rallied yesterday

afternoon (July 17) outside congressman Darrell Issa's Vista office to protest the "border surge" called for by the bipartisan Corker-Hoeven amendment to proposed federal immigration reform law that would significantly increase militarization of the U.S./Mexico border, adding 20,000 Border Patrol agents (more than doubling the current force), \$4.5 billion in funding for increased border surveillance, and another 350 miles of fencing along the border.

The protest was one of 11 happening nationwide during a "day of action" called by the Border Network for Human Rights.

While waiting for busloads of demonstrators that were delayed in traffic, several early arrivals took photographs and video of a lone counter-protester who stood behind his van, silently videotaping the afternoon's proceedings and participants, holding a sign and wearing a self-fashioned paper tri-point hat festooned with teabags and American flags, both reading "I didn't vote for this Obamanation."

When the rally began, speakers (in Spanish) decried the amendment and the challenges and intimidation they said increased scrutiny would present for both undocumented migrants and legal residents. Supporters raised signs with slogans such as "Control the Border Patrol" and "No Human is Illegal."

"We stand against the militarization of our neighborhoods and the growing number of deaths associated with it along the border," said Lillie Sanchez of the Human Rights Council of Oceanside via a translated statement.

"We do not consent to the wasteful use of our tax dollars being spent for more agents, military weaponry, and drones," added Rosie Diaz of the Bi-National Front of Indigenous Organizations. "Instead, we propose to direct economic resources that we produce with our labor into healthcare, education, and housing for our families."

Destination Lindbergh; destruction Old Town

It would transform the way travelers use our airport, reduce traffic congestion around [Lindbergh Field] and take advantage of the airport's close proximity to Interstate 5 by providing access right into the airport."

That was former mayor Jerry Sanders during a March 2009 city council hearing, describing "Destination Lindbergh," the \$6.3 billion plan to

reconfigure Lindbergh Field.

The goal of the build-out of San Diego's airport, said a report commissioned by the City of San Diego and San Diego Association of Governments, is to "minimize airport-related traffic impacts to adjacent communities, and

improve intermodal access to the Airport, while considering the Airport as a potential location for a regional transportation hub."

Preliminary plans include moving support facilities, air freight, passenger processing areas, and parking to the north side of Lindbergh Field on Pacific Highway. Reconfiguring the airport would connect the trolley and train to the airport via an automated walkway as well as provide direct access to drivers traveling on Interstate 5.

Elected officials, environmentalists, and mass-transit proponents celebrated the plan. But a group of residents near Old Town say the plan

is incomplete and fails to address the congested interchange of Interstate 5 with Interstate 8.

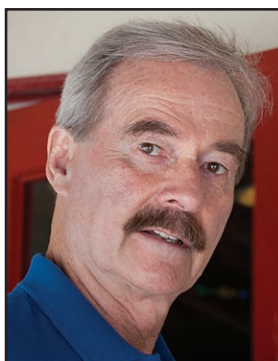
They fear the city and San Diego Association of Governments are hiding plans to build a connector ramp from Pacific Highway to Interstate 8, running along Taylor Street and cutting through Old Town.

The two public entities have assumed control of the transit and transportation portions of the project. And although the agencies have not released specific plans for a connector ramp, Old Town denizens consider it inevitable. After all, they say, where

else would the estimated four-million-plus vehicle increase per year on Pacific Highway near Old Town go?

"We have asked representatives from [San Diego Association of Governments] if they are planning such a Taylor Street connector ramp, but they will not confirm or deny it," reads an April 10 draft letter from the Old Town Community Planning Group to the agency's board of directors.

"Neither [San Diego Association of Governments], nor the City, have had public discussion about this regional transportation issue. Instead they appear to be hiding the

connector ramp within the 'the 2050 Circulation Plan' and disguising its implementation as mitigations of unrelated projects."

The ramp, according to the Old Town Community Planning Group, would shave off portions of Presidio Park and encroach on Old Town while at the same time directing additional traffic to the popular tourist attraction.

But poor transportation planning, or lack thereof, has been a complaint from residents for some time.

Thurston Coe, chair of the Old Town Community Planning Group, says that traffic

UNDER THE RADAR

UCSD flunks rabbit test Federal regulators have sent UCSD a warning notice regarding the university's alleged violation of federal regulations in the treatment of an animal at one of the school's experimental test labs. On April 8, administrators were told that they had failed a March 13 inspection of the facilities: "In the animal room, a rabbit was being held in an enclosure that did not meet our minimum space requirements for the weight of the animal," the finding says. "The rabbit was not provided with water and the enclosure was placed on top of a standard round, plastic storage container."



UCSD housed a rabbit without providing it with water.

"According to the facility representative, an animal care staff member had cleaned the rabbit's cage and temporarily placed the rabbit in the smaller enclosure which was then left in the room unattended," continued the report.

"The representative stated that an animal care staff member would be back in 10 to 15 minutes to return the rabbit to its primary enclosure. The small size of the enclosure and lack of water could lead to the unnecessary discomfort of the rabbit."

Concluded the citation: "The placement of the holding cage on the plastic container was not secure and could potentially be knocked over. The facility took immediate corrective action and moved the rabbit to an enclosure that met our minimum space requirements and provided the animal with water. Failure to handle all animals in a careful and safe manner may adversely affect their health and wellbeing. A system should be in place to ensure all animals are handled as carefully as possible."

Moving targets The controversial possibility of installing new electronic billboards downtown continues to be a lucrative affair for GOP lobbyist **Paul Robinson**. According to his latest financial disclosure report of July 11, he got \$5000 from Capitol Outdoor to lobby 11 city officials about the matter, including city councilman **David Alvarez** and **Allen Jones** of the mayor's office. By coincidence, Alvarez has called for the resignation of fellow Democrat **Bob Filner** as

mayor, and Jones recently quit Filner's employ during the alleged sexual harassment scandal.

News product placement

What's news to NBC-owned TV station KNSD, at least according to its latest federally required "issues and program list," covering the operation's

news coverage during the period between April 1 and June 30? First, a little something to make a certain German car dealer happy: "With nearly 40-percent of its energy produced on-site, BMW leads the country in relying on renewables. The

Environmental Protection Agency was suffi-

ciently impressed, and recently added BMW to its green power partners list." And mention of a local tourist powerhouse: "The grand opening for Legoland's new hotel in Carlsbad is today! Legoland says its hotel is designed to bring children's imaginations to life. All 250 rooms are themed with one of three popular Lego toy lines — pirates, adventurer or Kingdom. All rooms have a queen-sized bed for parents, plus a sleeping area for kids. The hotel also has interactive play areas, a pool and restaurant."

Another KNSD top story: "TV viewers in L.A., Phoenix, and San Francisco will be seeing ads asking them to vacation here in San Diego. The promotion is branded 'Happiness is Calling.' It was sponsored by the city's tourism authority and SeaWorld." And there was this Memorial Day update: "From the San Diego Zoo, to the Gaslamp District, tourism traffic was booming. We got a sampling of feedback on how our visitors enjoyed the time they spent here, and what it means for our

local economy. Everybody we interviewed had great things to say. And plans to return, too."

The station's top political reporter looked into the business practices of an online competitor for advertising dollars: "The local search site 'Yelp' is a widely used online resource for small businesses. But some object to its methods and promotional practices. NBC 7's **Gene Cubbison** is here with perspective from two local firms who share suspicions about Yelp's 'good faith' in the marketplace." And in other developments: "Tonight,

TIJUANA

“Zonkeys” a dying breed With tourism down, painted burros struggle to earn a buck

The “zonkey,” the zebra-esque black-and-white painted burros seen in several locations along Tijuana’s Avenida Revolución, is a dying breed. Lack of tourism along the route is blamed for the dwindling resources allocated to the creatures. Technology has also lopped off a large portion of revenue.

The animals have been a mainstay of Avenida Revolución since the 1940s, when black-and-white photography was de rigueur and any kid who didn’t have a picture of himself atop a pony (or, in this case, a burro) was missing out on a family tradition.

Once able to garner \$50 or more a day for their handlers, the placid, corn-husk-devouring creatures are barely able to make a buck in 2013. After all, a zonkey cannot live on corncobs alone, and the occasional alfalfa and pail of grain are greatly appreciated. Some zonkey owners have taken to requesting one-dollar contributions for burro chow, and restaurants have contributed vegetable trimmings for the animals to munch

on during the day.

Another aspect of the problem is the advent of digital photography. Where, once, old cameras were used to create a single black-and-white photograph, processed on the spot for five bucks or so, now tourists expect to shoot dozens of photos in color, using their own equipment — and for free.

Still, attempts are being made to ensure that these living objets d’art do not go the way of the dodo bird. Gabriel Rivera Delgado, coordinator of the Tijuana’s historical archive, feels that the zonkeys can be saved through an educational campaign that encourages the public to appreciate zonkeys’ historical importance to Tijuana’s image.

Crime uptick is U.S.’s fault Travel advisory rankles Tijuana mayor, blames deported Mexican prisoners

The U.S. State Department has just issued its most recent advisory for U.S. citizens contemplating travel to Baja California, prompting an angry response from Tijuana mayor Carlos Bustamante.

The advisory, issued on Friday, July 12, paints a relatively alarming picture of travel in Mexico and has this specifically to say about Baja California:

“Baja California (north): Tijuana, Ensenada and Mexicali are major cities/travel destinations in the state of Baja California.... You should exercise caution in the northern state of Baja California, particularly at night. There were 278 homicides in Tijuana from January to June 2013. Mexicali’s murder rate has climbed from 14.3 per 100,000 in 2011 to 15.8 per 100,000 in 2012.

“In the majority of these cases, the killings

Into Mexico

Sometimes I forget that a mere 15 miles away from downtown San Diego is a whole-nother country, with its own customs and laws that, despite their close proximity to America, are light years away from those to which we Americans are accustomed. So if you, hypothetically speaking, were to cross the border heading north and bust past two checkpoints and then run a stop sign, it is not inconceivable that you'd go down in a hail of gunfire emanating from the U.S. Border Patrol, the NSA, or whoever it is these days who mans those absurdly high fences.

But while heading south, when my father did exactly that — bypassed the checkpoints and failed to stop at a giant red-and-white ALTO despite the super-high speed bump he sped over, which caused every set of teeth in the car to clatter from the jolt — the Mexican military or

Tijuana cops, or whoever they've got manning their side of the fence, didn't seem concerned. "Shit, Dad," I said. "What are you doing running stop signs? Those are guns they're holding over there."

"I didn't see it, I swear," Dad said, giggling nervously and smiling a sheepish smile. "Everything's completely different since my last visit," he said. "It's tough to tell which way to go." In his defense, there had been a lot of construction and re-routing at the world's busiest border crossing, and it had been a while since my father's last visit to the Tijuana orphanage at which he used to volunteer.

I polled the backseat. "Is everyone okay back there?" David, Terri, and Remel all nodded. "Okay then, it doesn't look like we're being followed. I smiled and shook my head and then looked down at the printed email in my hands. "Sorry I snapped at you, Daddy. Thanks again for driving us down here. We're headed to the corner of Fifth and Revolución."

A friend had advised me to not refer to our day-trip as "a shooting in TJ," but that's what we were doing, for Art Pulse TV, a show that covers the arts in the region, which means San Diego County and Baja. Because this was our first shoot in Mexico, I wanted the team to travel together. But not everyone and our equipment would fit in my Mini or Remel's two-seater sports car or Terri's Car 2 Go, so I took my father up on a prior generic offer to "lend a hand" and asked him if he'd squeeze us all in his Camry and drive us into Mexico. That probably wasn't what he'd had in mind when he'd said, "Let me know if there's anything I can do to help you out," but Dad, in his generosity and

willingness for adventure, only hesitated for the briefest of moments before saying yes.

Terri and I were cohosting from location at El Colegio, one of chef Miguel Guerrero's restaurants (he's the guy who is said to have invented the whole Baja-Med movement). We were an hour into the shoot when a small delivery truck, converted into a rolling circus cage, appeared on the street and stopped at a red light in front of us. "Tiger!" I shouted, staring out the window in disbelief. The giant white cat (I'd never seen a white tiger in person) was pacing back and forth within the small, disorienting confines of its mobile domicile. Dad was quick to act — he ran outside with his phone to get pics and video.

In the time it takes a traffic light to change, my father was re-entering the restaurant, grinning with the glee of a boy on his first visit to the circus. "Can you believe that?" he laughed. "Anything can happen in TJ! I forgot what an adventure it is just being here."

But it was only a few hours later that I found myself thinking, *I forgot what an adventure it is just trying to get out of here.* I'd heard of the SENTRI pass, which takes around \$120 and a bunch of paperwork to get, but I hadn't gotten around to applying for one. Nor had my father, so we were stuck in the long line of cars waiting to get into the States.

We purchased churros (and were ripped off by a guy who could only make change in pesos) and then apologized profusely to my father when we remembered how messy those things are to eat. We were

recapping the events of the day, chatting about the tiger and the zonkey that Terri had gotten to sit on when Dad suddenly snapped, "What the...? Get off of there!" at a guy who appeared out of nowhere and had begun cleaning the windshield on my side of the car. Suddenly, my window began to open and Dad was grousing louder at the man, his Brooklyn attitude bubbling to the surface.

"What are you doing?" I shrieked, holding my finger on the switch so my window would close back up. "You're going to curse at a guy through my open window? If you piss him off, who's within his reach? I'll tell you who — your daughter." Dad laughed, and I immediately felt stupid for my con-
 ception fit. I wasn't really worried that the poor guy with the squeegee was going to hurt me, but I saw no point in picking an argument with someone with a bucket and a stick in his hand while we were all trapped in a mostly-parked car, especially when mine was the only open window.

"I want that turtle," Terri said from the back. "And that glittery Guadalupe. And that bald eagle."

"That one?" Dad said, extending his arm and index finger to point at a collection of statues lining the right side of the road. As soon as my father made this gesture, purveyors of purses, ceramics, oversized crucifixes, and all kinds of border tchotchkes pounced upon our vehicle, and we spent the next minute firmly shaking our heads to discourage their persistence. From that moment on, we knew not to point.

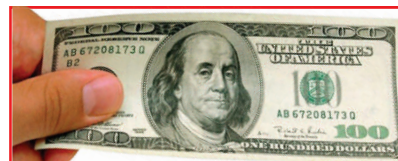

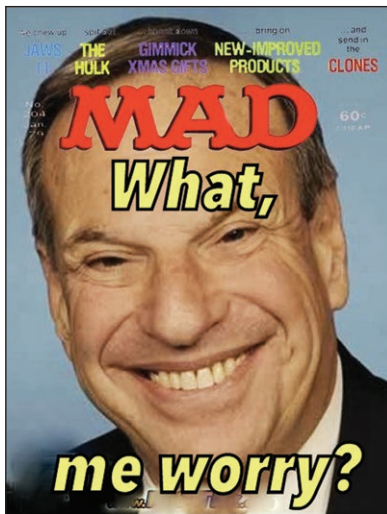

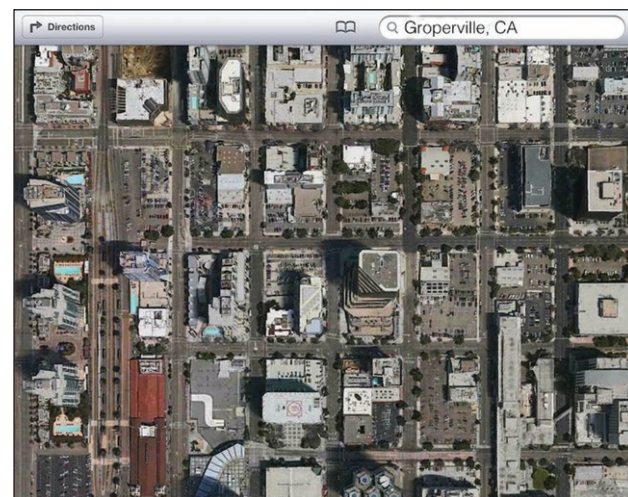

Sitting on a one-acre lot that the listing office describes as the “highest point in Bonita,” the 9045-square-foot estate at 368 Surrey Drive is the most luxurious property currently available in any of San Diego’s South Bay neighborhoods.

The 2009-built home has seven bedrooms, eight full baths, and an eight-car detached garage with wooden doors that swing out rather than up to open, evoking images of an old-fashioned carriage

house.

Other interior amenities include an elevator, a stone wine cellar with a seating area and tast-

ing bar, a kitchen with a large center island and stone-and-brick inlaid walls, and a private theater with stadium seating

for its individual leather recliners. A billiards room features a granite-topped wet bar with glass-faced beverage coolers.


Extensive work went into the finish details, including the wood-beam ceilings, “incredible” custom doors and windows, “designer paint” and wall finishes, and “unbelievable custom wrought iron” throughout the residence.

Outside, a rooftop deck offers 360-degree views, including a panorama of the downtown San Diego skyline and the Point Loma peninsula. The backyard offers several terraced patios for relaxing or entertaining surrounding the pool and spa, including a seating area around a large outdoor fireplace. A tile-roofed gazebo covers a full outdoor kitchen and second bar area, while the rest of the grounds are covered with grassy lawns and tropical plants.

The home was built

for Michael A. Vogt, a commercial real estate agent and developer and longtime South Bay local. Vogt and his wife Kellie own and operate International Real Estate Development in Chula Vista. Michael’s website states that he’s been involved in the development of \$200,000,000 worth of commercial and industrial property, including the 450,000-square-foot Eastlake Design District.

In 2010, however, the property fell into default over non-payment of a \$2.4 million deed of trust (public records also show a \$1.5 million second loan recorded against the property). After several failed attempts to sell the property, it went to foreclosure in March of 2011 and was purchased from City National Bank by O P Properties, LLC,



two months later for \$1,950,000.

A web search turns up several property investment companies operating under the name "O P Properties," the nearest one in Westlake Village, California. No information could be obtained about the parties behind the O P name, and no contact data aside from the Surrey property address is

available via public records.

After holding the property for a period of about 18 months, O P listed the home for sale in December of 2012 with a posted asking price of \$5,950,000. No response was received from the listing agent with regard to what, if any, improvements had been made to the property to justify the asking price more

than tripling from what it most recently sold for, though the photos from the home's previous listing when it was bank-owned indicate the condition was much the same at that time.

After over 200 days on the market, the list price remains unchanged, making the Surrey Drive estate the highest-priced home in the area by more than \$2 million. ■

Tennis pro Zeke Hindle in Tibet — he’s ranked “hundred-and-something” in the nation

Making a living as a professional athlete is for a very few. Making a good living is for a tiny percentage of the very few. Introducing Zeke Hindle (real name), 27, professional tennis player. Zeke abides in the lowest rung of professional tennis, “futures” tournaments.

He was in Egypt, playing tennis, when the riots went off, and he was still in Egypt, playing tennis, when Morsi was overthrown. I heard Zeke was back in town and arranged to meet. We talked for more than an hour. Follows is some of what he said.

“I was born in Santa Monica in 1986. My mom was a ballerina. My dad is an actor and does administrative work for the Screen Actors Guild.

“I went to Loyola High School. I was overweight, a total dork. I picked up tennis when I was 15, 16. Had a lot of doubts [about tennis] and still have a lot of doubts. It was tougher for me because a lot of the guys I competed against had been playing since they were four or five years old. I started so late, I had to lose a lot. That’s still with me, losing a lot.

“I trained with a Swedish coach [Evert Kruse] from 16 to 20. He’s the one that got me believing in myself. I played in junior tournaments, probably ranked 200 in California, which is not good. It’s not bad, but for what I wanted to do in tennis it wasn’t that good.

“I worked to support my tennis. Got a job at 24 Hour Fitness, worked retail sales at Abercrombie & Fitch, was certified as a masseur, did massage for awhile, detailed cars with friends, and did yard work.

“Futures tournaments go all over the U.S. There’s about 40 tournaments a year on the circuit. I played tournaments in Southern California, won a couple matches, but didn’t

do too well. I ended up ranked as hundred-and-something in the nation.

“I started playing full time. One summer I drove cross-country three times. Stayed in people’s houses. You show up the day before the tournament and sign in. That national ranking gets you in. If you don’t have a national ranking, you can still get in, but you’ll get pushed out if enough people with ranking sign up.”

Last summer, Zeke took a trip to Tibet with his fiancée — also an expert tennis player — and her father and uncle. When the couple returned, they needed to make a decision.

“She was uncertain whether or not she wanted to play. There’s no way I could travel internationally without her help. Finally, we decided to go to Turkey for 12 weeks. They have men’s and women’s tournaments in the same location. Twelve tournaments, each tournament is a week. When one tournament ends, qualifying starts for the next tournament.

“I played singles and doubles. There’s no qualifying for doubles. You get in on your ranking or you don’t. In qualifying tournaments, you have to win anywhere from two to four matches to get into the tournament. That’s when you play for money and play for points. It’s called, ‘By qualifying in the main draw.’ Every tournament is set up like that. Wimbledon is set up like that. I got through qualifying three times and lost close ones in the main draw.”

Zeke and his fiancée moved on to Greece for three weeks of tournaments. Then, his lady returned to California, Zeke continued to tour, arriving in Cairo on June 1.

“I’d heard about [the uprising]. I knew there were protests, so I didn’t arrive on the weekend. I heard they protest every weekend, march on the streets. I wasn’t there, so I didn’t see anything; it was just a crowded, impoverished city from what I saw.

“I was playing tennis in a resort city called Sharm el-Sheikh, 500 kilometers from Cairo. I played five tournaments in a row, from June 1 to July 4.

“I lost some close ones to guys who are 300 or 400 in the world. In hindsight, I had a lot of opportunities to do well and get some points. Came up a little short. I did my best with what I had at the time, so I don’t feel too badly.

“Leaving Egypt wasn’t bad at all; it was very routine. The news makes it look totally different than what it actually was. Staying in Sharm el-Sheikh, you would not know anything was happening; it’s like staying in Palm Springs and there’s something going on in Chicago. You wouldn’t see it. There were more guys with AK-47s at the airport than when I arrived. That was the only difference. It was a normal go-to-the-airport-and-fly-home. There was nothing I could see that said revolution.”

"I stepped onto a stand-up paddleboard once," said my friend Sophia, "and promptly fell headfirst into the water." She got the hang of it, though, and now she wants me to join her.

"We offer paddleboard lessons every day at 9 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m., and 3 p.m.," said Rick Gehris, owner of Surfari Surf School in Mission Beach (858-337-3287; surfarisurf.com). "They run about an hour, and then once the lesson is over, you get an hour of practice time on your own [group rate, \$55; semiprivate, \$65; private, \$85]. We do the lessons at Sail Bay in Mission Bay. The water is really calm there. But we start out with ten minutes of land-based instruction. That's where we go over how to hold the paddle and the safety dos and don'ts."

When you hold the paddle, "you want to hold the paddle with the blade out at an angle. Most beginners hold the blade facing in. You put one hand on the top of the paddle and the other in the middle, and you keep your arms straight. If you bend them, you wind up using your small muscles. If you keep them straight, you use your core — the back and shoulders and the hips. And we show you how to turn the board by backstroking."

As for safety, said Gehris, "the most important thing is, if you fall, push the paddle away from you so that you don't land on it. Then, swim to the board first and then get the paddle. It's very hard to swim with a paddle in your hand. You get back on the board by laying on it with your chest, grabbing one rail with your hand, and using your momentum to slide your feet onto the tail of the board. Then go to your knees, and then to your feet."

Once the class moves to the water, "We have you paddle on your knees to the middle of the bay and then have you pop up to your feet by putting your hands on the board and pushing up."

Surfari offers a wide variety of boards. "They come in different shapes and sizes. The wider the board, the more stable it is. The length you choose will be based on your size and weight. I have 9-, 10-, 11-, and 12-footers."

Gehris left me with a pro tip: "It's easy going downwind, but remember that you'll

have to turn around at some point. When you go upwind, you have to shorten your stroke, and it's harder and takes longer. I recommend hugging the water's edge, about 50 yards out. When you turn back into the wind, you won't struggle as much; it's much harder going upwind in the middle of the bay."

Over at SUP Coronado (619-888-7686; supcoronado.com), cofounder Vicki Carson explained the nonprofit she runs with her sister Crystal. "She teaches bay lessons, and I teach ocean lessons. We have a flexible fee — we ask for \$60 to \$100, but we tell people they can pay whatever they can afford. We take people out by appointment only, since we both have full-time jobs. If we can't find a time that works for you and for us, we'll refer you to the Coronado Recreation Department. They also rent boards and give lessons."

SUP Coronado's lessons last 90 minutes.

"If you go out with me, I'll teach you to catch waves. We go to Tideland Park in Coronado, and since the beach there faces south, we don't get direct hits from the swells. So, it's nice and gentle, a great place to learn. I show up with a van and about 12 boards ranging from 9 to 12 feet. I think correct equipment is about 80 percent of being able to paddleboard on the ocean, and I'll make sure you're on the right board for your size. It's easier than surfing — you're already standing when you go to catch the wave."

Other places around town:

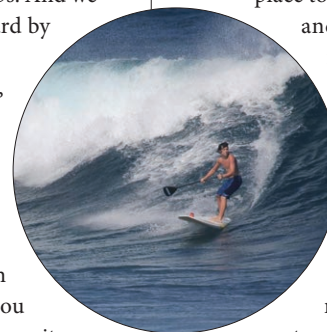
Aqua Adventures in Mission Bay (619-523-9577; aqua-adventures.com) charges \$50 for a one-hour lesson, including equipment. Additional paddleboard rentals are \$22 for an hour, \$40 for two hours.

Mission Bay Sports Center in Mission Bay (858-488-1004; missionbaysportscenter.com) rents paddleboards: one hour, \$15; two hours, \$30; three to four hours, \$45; all day, \$60.

BAJA IS BACK



**“I’ve never seen a bullet shot,
I’ve never seen a gun pulled...
It really is a perception, and
it’s just wrong.”**

In a December 2011 *Vanity Fair* article, writer Dana Vachon described Chula Vista as “a sputtering neon error of beauty academies and pawnshops, recently terrorized by a homicidal Tijuana drug gang skilled at dissolving bodies in chemicals.” He also referred to the year 1989 as a time before “Mexicans were festooning highways with one another’s severed heads.” When the article came out, Chula Vistans and their mayor responded with vehement demands that *Vanity Fair* writers check their facts (there is only one beauty academy, damn it) and come visit this beloved seven-miles-from-the-border town before taking their stories to print.

The same month the article was published, my husband and I bought a house in Chula Vista, and so I understood the embarrassment over the description. At the same time, factual or not, the writer had aptly summarized the images that presented themselves to me whenever I considered a day-trip across the border. While I hardly felt terrorized in Chula Vista, I was clear on the fact that I would not be going to Mexico anytime soon.

And then, this past Easter weekend, less than a year and a half later, I was hit with the realization that half of everyone I know was either currently gallivanting around Mexico or had just returned. Yes, I’d seen articles in the *New York Times* about the burgeoning art scene in Tijuana, and in the *Wall Street Journal* and *Condé Nast Traveler* about the wine country of Valle de Guadalupe. But somehow, as hip and delicious as all that sounded, I’d never relinquished my fear. Here it was, *Semana Santa* (holy week),

and I was home in Eastlake wondering when Mexico had stopped being a scary place to visit and whether I was the last person still hung up on beheadings, while everyone else was living it up in Baja.

According to Baja California’s secretary of tourism, Juan Tintos Funcke, the area has “seen more tourists, particularly Americans, visiting Baja California in the past two years, especially over the holidays. For example, from Thursday through Sunday of Easter week, 354,000 people traveled within Baja California, the largest influx of tourists we’ve seen since 2008.”

Funcke also shared the results of a 2012 survey on travelers’ perceptions conducted among 600 Southern Californians (in San Bernardino, Riverside, San Diego, Imperial, Orange, and Los Angeles counties). Respondents who perceive Baja to be unsafe decreased by 16 percent from a 2011 survey. Respondents who would not visit Baja because of “dan-

ger, crime, and drugs” decreased by 44 percent.

On the other hand, of the 177 people who took the March 31 “Has Fear of Crime Kept You from Visiting Mexico?” poll on the *Reader* website, 96 answered, “Yes. It’s way too dangerous to visit Mexico right now.” Only 16 answered, “No! Mexico is safe. Don’t believe the hype!” The other 65 chose option C: “Depends where you go in Mexico. Some places are safe; some aren’t.”

A single commenter, who goes by the handle “MsSheree,” wrote: “As an adult I used to travel to Puerto Nuevo outside Rosarito Beach frequently (six to seven times per year) for lobster and have stayed at Rosarito Beach Hotel a few times, but when all the killings started a few years ago we stopped going.”

The real danger is crossing the street

I figure one day I’ll venture out for a restaurant-hop of her picks, but for this first time I opt instead for a visit to the *pasajes* of downtown Tijuana, with gallery owners Josué Castro and Andrew Sheiner.

At the end of his day

as a second-grade teacher at Central Elementary School in Imperial Beach, North Park resident Sheiner meets me at the H Street trolley stop in Chula Vista to chaperone me across the border. He and Hillcrest resident and artist Castro opened what Castro calls a “laboratory for experiments” in Tijuana in 2012. Located in Pasaje Gómez on Avenida Revolución, La Tentación is an experimental gallery dedicated to the photographic arts. Their tagline reads, “Lead us into temptation. Deliver us from our borders.”

At the trolley station, Sheiner hands me a bottle of water and guides me over the trolley tracks to the southbound side. Having traveled all over the world, sometimes alone, before settling down in San Diego, I’m a little embarrassed

that I feel the need for a chaperone, but I'm grateful to have one, in part for myself, and in part to ease my husband's anxiety about my visit to Tijuana. As a Department of Defense civilian employee, my husband sits through frequent travel-advisory briefings. Although Baja has been removed from the "mandatory" Do Not Travel list for employees, it remains on the "recommended" Do Not Travel list. Therefore, my husband is really nervous, and not at all into the idea of me crossing the border. He's instructed me to text him the moment I meet up with Sheiner and the moment I return to the

U.S. side. Were it not for Sheiner, he'd have been much less okay with this.

It's 4:00 p.m., and the trolley cars are crowded. We ride standing up and hanging on for 20 minutes or so, until we disembark with everyone else at the San Ysidro station. We follow the crowd past the McDonald's, up an incline, through a large revolving gate, and into Mexico. From there, it's a five-minute (and \$5) cab ride to the gallery, where Castro awaits.

"You can pay \$1 or 10 pesos to share a ride with four other people to the downtown area, or just pay the \$5 to get your own cab," Sheiner says. "If you go to other parts

of the city, though, you can't do the share deal."

And in case I want to come alone next time, he instructs me to tell the cab driver, "Third and Madero" or "Revolución and Third."

I've heard and read about these *pasajes*, but even photographs haven't prepared me for the sensation of having traveled by *Star Trek* transporter. One minute we're in downtown Tijuana, among the cart vendors, drugstores, taco stands, and people everywhere. Then we turn down an alley between buildings and suddenly we're in this in-between place, not outside anymore, but not completely inside either. The roofs of these alleyways are covered with translucent yellow and green corrugated plastic, so the weather doesn't come through but light does. The walkways are lined with 250-square-foot storefronts, art galleries and vintage shops, blackbox theaters, cafés, and dentist offices.

At this time of day,

Pasaje Gómez is quiet, with only a few storefronts open. In the evening, more of the metal gates will rise, Sheiner says, and the *pasaje* will

liven up. Many of the business owners have day-jobs.

Castro steps out of La Tentación and greets us as we approach. He is

as olive-skinned as the red-headed Sheiner is fair. After we embrace, he throws an arm around Sheiner's shoulders.

"We're the odd couple," Castro says. "A Jewish *pelo rojo* and a Mexican Jew. It's interesting for a lot of people. We have a lot of fun."

The two laugh and then Castro launches into his explanation of how they ended up here.

"A friend of mine invited me to this place — a *pasaje*," he says. "*Pasajes* are like little malls that were very popular in the 1930s, '40s, and '50s. They were very crowded. There were a lot of them in Tijuana, especially in La Revolución — Revolución Street. After 9/11, the economy was brought down and a lot of these *pasajes* were closed and abandoned. They just closed the doors and the curtains for almost 11 years, until we started opening them again. So now it's like a little art district."

Castro says the recent renewed interest in Baja "started with the Valle de Guadalupe and their wine attracting the attention of Americans. There have been many Baja food and wine articles."

Sheiner adds, "We said, 'If they're talking about food and wine, why don't we start talking about art?'"

When they first opened the gallery, with

the encouragement of the Museum of Photographic Arts' Debra Klotchko, they started with a 250-square-foot space. 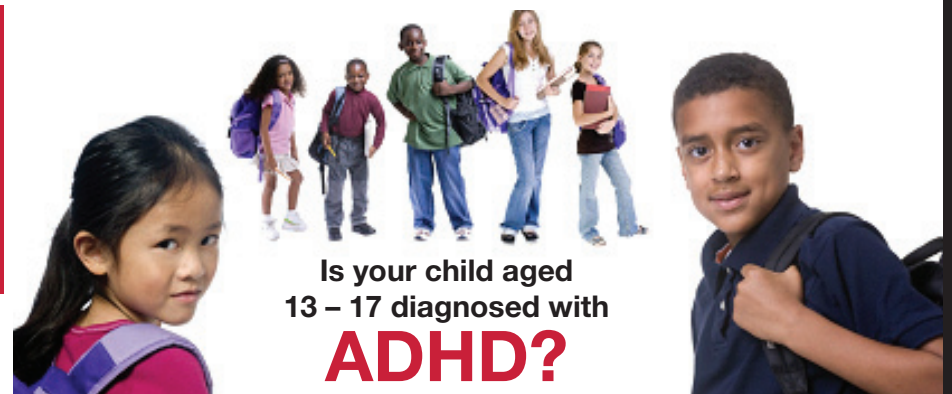

bringing people from the United States, especially [people over] a certain age. I'm 57, but, you know, people that are older than 40 are more afraid. Most of the people that go from the United States to our openings and exhibitions are very young."

Sheiner came to Baja for the first time with Castro, who is a former Tijuana resident, six or seven years ago. They would spend the day, go out to eat, see art, or maybe take a trip farther south to one of the wineries.

"Andrew is most adventurous," Castro says. "Now he knows all the good *taquerías*, the good vendors. He shows me things I don't know."

Sheiner laughs. "The zeal of the convert," he says.

Like my husband, Sheiner's wife was nervous about his trips across the border. But eventually, she was able to let go of her fear.

"She said, 'If you're with Castro, I trust you,'" Sheiner says. "After coming so many times, she became comfortable, too."

Okay, I say, but what if she came on her own? Does he trust that she'd be safe?

"As long as she looks

both ways crossing the street," he jokes. "That's the real danger."

You asked for an authentic experience

The aforementioned perception study on travel to Baja from Southern California revealed three particular pain points: 11 percent of respondents do not have a passport (a decrease of 3 percent from the 2011 survey); 43 percent of respondents are not satisfied with the border wait, with San Diegans being the least satisfied, and; women

still perceive Baja as less secure than men do.

In the case of my husband, I think the opposite is true, at least as far as perceptions about the safety of Baja go. So, in order to minimize his anxieties on my next visit to Tijuana, I take my friend S with me. We meet up with Derrik Chinn, founder of Turista Libre, who speeds us around town in a black Jetta, playing techno music on his iPod.

Normally, he'd have driven us around in the minivan he uses for pri-

vate custom tours, but today calls for a more casual vibe. We start with Sapphire Gin drinks, Mexican craft beer, and mushroom-and-octopus tacos at Erizo Baja Fish House in the neighborhood of La Recta, which Chinn describes as “the La Jolla of Tijuana.”

Erizo is one of four kitchens in Tijuana run by chef Javier Plascencia, whose family owns nine restaurants in Baja and Southern California, including Romesco in Bonita. It’s also one of the stops on a “Javier Plascencia progressive meal through Tijuana” that Chinn has in the works for early August. The natural-wood tabletops, the brushed-nickel chair legs, and the gray-with-flashes-of-turquoise color scheme call to mind some of San Diego’s newer,

hipper restaurants.

Chinn, a 31-year-old Ohio native who has lived in Tijuana just shy of six years, switches easily back and forth between speaking English with us and speaking a comfortable Spanish with our waiter.

While we all politely allow the last piece of tuna sashimi to sit on the plate between us, Chinn explains his take on the residual fear of Tijuana.

“I’m still not really sure if it’s specifically an American thing, a First World thing, or just plain human nature, but I’ve found that too often we personalize the information that we consume via mass media,” he says. “The truth is, that while 2008 was the bloodiest year in the city’s history, the crime rate has plummeted over the past

couple years.”

For a few minutes he philosophizes about “reasonable fear and paranoia” in the modern world. He also says that while some of the Southern California locals who join his “rad Tijuana tours” (to *lucha libre* matches, markets, beer fests, and so on) do

admit some fear in making the trip across the border on their own, the majority are more concerned about logistics.

“All that said,” he continues, “I cannot, nor do I ever, promise people that they’ll be completely out of harm’s way while in Tijuana. Just as I can’t or won’t while they’re

walking down their own street. To assume such a responsibility would be ridiculous.”

Even if he can’t promise I won’t break my ankle or get hit by a car, traveling through the city with Chinn, I feel like we are in good hands. He points out landmarks and talks history as we drive to Playas, where the border fence runs into the Pacific Ocean.

When another driver tells him that the Jetta has a flat tire, Chinn shouts, “*Gracias, güey!*” out his window, joking with us that living in Tijuana has, out of necessity, given him a newfound ability to take life as it comes.

A few minutes later, his car up on a jack, he smiles, shrugs his shoulders at me, and says, “You wanted an authentic experience.”

Bye-bye to the \$10 all-you-can-drink bar

Like Castro, Chinn blames the lingering fear of Mexico on stories in the media.

“In the case of Tijuana, it’s tales of headless bodies dangling over freeways,” he says. “Shootouts in the streets, corpses dissolved in vats of acid, and other acts of narco warfare — horrific nightmares, but horrific nightmares that really sell papers.”

Secretary of Baja tourism Funcke says that his office has made it a priority to combat the perception these stories create.

“We decided in 2010 to invest in more public relations, marketing, and promotional activities in America, because it was a very important priority to share our side of the

story and be accurately represented in the U.S. media. Additionally, American celebrities who visited Baja California, like Anthony Bourdain, Robert Redford, Rick Bayless, Sylvester Stallone, Andrew Zimmern, and more, helped us share all of the amazing experiences we have to offer — such as gastronomy, wine, adventure, and so much more — which was a big step in changing the perception of our state [and] reinvigorating tourism.”

There are still those who will likely not change their minds anytime soon. In a conversation I had with a friend of a friend, 33-year-old Valley Center resident Eric Navarre, I learned that there are still people who are vehemently against traveling to Baja.

“I’m adamant that people should not go down there,” Navarre tells me one afternoon over the phone. “It’s the drugs, it’s the violence, and in the last five years, it’s the abductions and the ransoms.”

Navarre grew up in Valley Center. He’s been to Mexico four times in his life, including his honeymoon cruise five years ago.

“At that time, it was the only honeymoon

vacation we could afford,” he says.

Before that, the last time Navarre had been to Baja was at age 17, when he’d gone with his older brother.

“We went to the different clubs, and it was just debauchery. It was just, ‘Let’s get everybody drunk and let’s take their

lines, and do-not-travel warnings to Americans interspersed with images of Bourdain walking across the border. Then, for the next 40 minutes of gastronomic adventure, Bourdain introduces viewers to restaurant owners, party promoters, musicians, and foodies. All reveal a more appeal-

money and then let’s put them back on the streets.’ I didn’t have a bad time there. I didn’t go to jail or anything. But I’m very fearful of going down there. You hear about the abductions, about the ransoms. Most of the cops don’t even have guns, but the criminals do, so there’s no protection for you down there.”

On May 28, 2012, Anthony Bourdain’s *No Reservations* aired an episode about Baja. It opens with a montage of audio and visual fear-inducing footage, newspaper head-

ing side of Tijuana and the rest of Baja than has been portrayed in mass media, maybe ever.

The expressive and mustachioed Tony T, whom Bourdain describes during the episode as a “law-school graduate turned night-life promoter” both confirms Navarre’s experiences and refutes their current validity. “What Tijuana is starting to realize is that the old concept of tourism here — a ten-dollar all-you-can-drink nasty bar full of Marines — is not going to fly anymore.

It's in the beginning phases of reinventing itself."

When I ask Navarre if this makes him at all curious, he sticks to his guns.

"There probably are great places down there. But you have to get through the *federales*, you have to get through the police force down there, and they're just as corrupt."

The plan to bring the gringos back to Baja isn't working fast enough

It's this kind of attitude that gets the goat of a guy who calls himself Baja Joe. His real name is Greg Reddick, and he has undertaken "a one-man crusade to return tourism to Baja." The 56-year-old former sales manager has created a website, a series of press releases, public-service announcements for the radio (for The Walrus 105.7, KPRI FM 102.1, The Mighty 1090 AM, and ESPN 1700 AM), and website banners, all aimed at convincing gringos that Baja is safe for tourists.

His campaign documents include a list of potential visitors' "objections" (they think it's unsafe, that there are long border waits,

and corrupt *federales*) along with his counter-arguments (Baja is safe, the SENTRI pass makes the border crossing quick and easy, and the tourist police are helpful and bilingual).

"It's a real pet peeve of mine that people don't understand some of these things," Reddick tells me over the phone. "In the last five years, I've spent three to five days a week building my [vacation]

loudspeaker going, 'A bank was just robbed on Clairemont Mesa and so-and-so. If you see a yellow car or whatever, report to the police.' I mean, you see this kind of thing here every single day. And I've never seen a bullet shot, I've never seen a gun pulled, or anything down [in Baja]. It really is a perception, and it's just wrong."

Reddick, too, believes that the false

home. I'm driving a convertible car up and down the road five days a week, as late as midnight, one o'clock [in the morning], and as early as six in the morning, from Ensenada to Tijuana, and I've never had one issue."

He tells a story of the neighborhood where he lives in San Diego.

"I had a helicopter flying over my house in Clairemont a couple of months ago, with a

perception of the area as less than safe is media-driven. He believes that Funcke and the tourism board haven't made the right decisions in the campaign to bring Americans back to Baja.

"What they've done — their plan to bring Americans back is not working as fast as it should. It's been four years since there's been really any crime of major consequences. Anthony

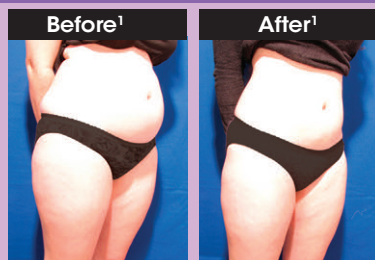

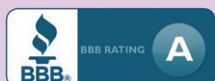

Bourdain did go down and do a story, and that was nice. They've [the Office of Tourism] done some nice work. But if you don't reach the masses and promote Baja as it is, as a fishing mecca with a great wine area and hotels right on the water, the perceptions of Americans is that it's like the O.K. Corral."

Most recently, in his mission to "be a big cog in the wheel that brings the masses back to Baja," Reddick printed 6500 business cards that he intends to pass out at front desks, bars, restaurants, and other locations along the Baja coastline. The cards are a combination advertisement (for his website, *BajasBackNow.com*) and handy numbers for tourists to dial for emergencies, mechanical needs, border crossing, or general information.

"Why there [in Baja] is because the people that are going down now will take those cards back, they'll put it in their wallet, and when they get back they can spread the news that Baja's back again. They'll have a website to share and go, 'Hey, dude, I was just down surfing at K-55 [Puerta del Mar], check this website out and share some of the information on why it's safe. Let's make a trip down there in the next month.' I'm going to [leave] some in Pacific Beach, as well."

It takes a few tries for me to get a clear answer on what, beyond feel-good feelings, Reddick gets out of his campaign. His go-to response is that it's a personal passion and that he's doing it "on behalf of the bars and restaurants and businesses down there." Eventually, however, he explains that these busi-

nesses are paying to be on his website.

"It's not enough to pay all my bills, trust me," he says. "Hopefully, down the road, we'll do more with the incoming secretary of tourism."

Regardless of who pays him and how much, Reddick's message is clear: "There's no reason not to get in your car and go to Baja for the weekend."

While Reddick's information cards may be enough to get some people over their fears and false perceptions, there are others of us who require a chaperone before venturing out on our own. After all the fear-mongering that takes place at his job, my husband is one of the latter. But he couldn't very well let me go by myself when the Office of the Baja California Secretary of Tourism came knocking with an opportunity to spend a weekend in Ensenada — especially when the trip came with a hotel shuttle to and from San Ysidro.

After an exasperating half hour of driving back and forth on East San Ysidro Boulevard, trying to follow the signs to a weekend parking lot, and then an equally annoying Friday-evening border wait, we finally hit the open road with our vivacious shuttle driver, Francisco Moyado. On the 100-kilometer drive from Tijuana to Ensenada, my husband sat forward on his van seat and reminisced about the days, pre-9/11, when he'd spent time in Baja; he'd once even considered living in Playas. He kept his eyes peeled for the La Fonda

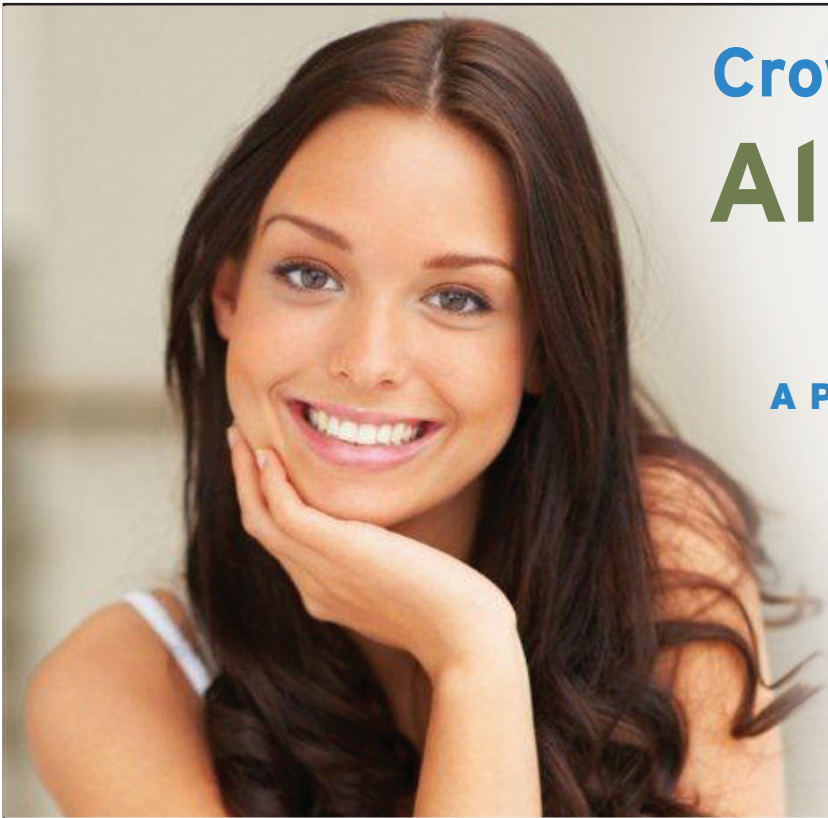
Hotel, where we stayed in 2007 during my brother's wedding weekend, and for the El Sauzal taco stand where I took the first picture ever of him with my two brothers. After a while, he grew comfortable with Francisco, pointing at billboards with sexily clad ladies, and joking about dropping me off at the hotel so the two of them could head out for a gentlemen's evening.

That night, he was nearly giddy over our room at Hotel Coral & Marina, and also over his margaritas and filet mignon at the hotel's restaurant downstairs. He then spent the rest of the weekend comparing the costs of these luxuries to what we would have paid in San Diego.

"How much is our room? Two hundred dollars? With that view and all that space, we'd have to pay \$600 a night, easy. Don't you think?... That meal was only \$60? We each had two drinks, an appetizer, dessert, and I had filet mignon. At home, we would have easily paid \$100... How much was the shuttle? It was \$225 each way, right? That's not bad. If we came with three other couples, that would be \$56.25 per couple."

On Saturday, Francisco drove us to the Monte Xanic winery. On Sunday, he took us down to El Mercado Negro in Ensenada, where we hopped on a boat and took a ride out to the Open Ocean Aquarium to swim with the bluefin tuna. And although he is not a wine guy, and although the boat ride resulted in both of us upchucking over the side of the vessel, I do believe my husband is Baja's newest convert. ■

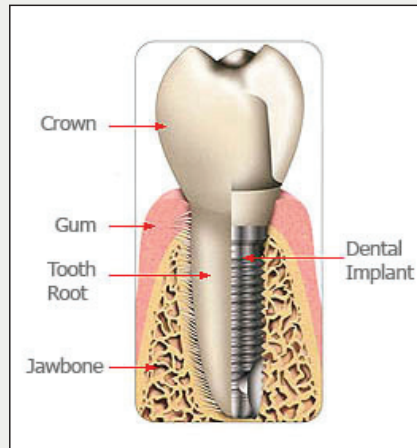

Are the Volunteers Getting Hosed?

Nicio Aguilera is blunt: "Nobody up here trusts the county. We don't trust them, we don't like them." Aguilera, who spent 15 years fighting fires in Philadelphia and another 15 at a Carlsbad station, is one of a cadre of backcountry locals manning the front lines against what he calls a "power grab."

"The county had approximately 18 fire

stations which are theoretically volunteer," Aguilera says. "Gradually, the county is gobbling them up in what they consider, I guess, to be a friendly way. They want to make them into a county fire department."

However, the county says it's not that simple. Supervisor Dianne Jacob,

who kicked off the effort to consolidate area firefighting agencies in 2008, states, "The consolidation of local, rural fire agencies, including the Julian-Cuyamaca Fire Protection District, with the County Fire Authority will make for a stronger, more cohesive firefighting force the next time a major wild-fire hits. Consolidation has already helped provide around-the-clock fire protection in areas that previously had limited or no coverage."

Even by governmental standards, the firefighting structure in San Diego County is Byzantine, rife with gerrymandering, overlaps, gaps, and an intrinsic absence of cohesion. But up in Julian, a lot of folks think it's worth preserving.

"The local district is in charge of the structures," Aguilera says. "Theoretically, if there's a structure fire, we go first. Cal Fire is wild land. But during last week's fire,

Cal Fire — they were all gone. Station 52, Cuyamaca, gone. Station 50, Julian, gone — nobody there."

The Julian squad consists of around 30 volunteers equipped with beepers; when they get the call, they go to the firehouse or meet up at the scene. To the unpaid blaze-busters and their supporters, it's no less than an American tradition, and a ubiquitous one at that.

"In our country," notes Aguilera, "approximately 80 percent of the fire departments are still volunteer, 20 percent paid. It's sort of a surprising fact, but that's the truth. A lot of small towns don't have the budget for a paid fire department. They count on volunteers from the local community to come out, to be willing to serve and to be trained, whatever they have to go through to do the

job. A lot of people like volunteer fire departments because it's your neighbors comin' to help you. It's 'old-style,' right?"

According to Aguilera, at least some of the impetus to dissolve the Julian-Cuyamaca Fire Protection District has come from the district's own "fire board." Aguilera fumes, "The board told us we were \$100,000 behind, our ambulance service wasn't making any money, and that by the end of the year we'd be broke. They wanted us to vote to shut down our fire department and

gave us one month to make up our mind. But, guess what? We did our own audit and we're actually \$50,000 in the black. A lot of people are suspicious of the fire board. They want to know what's going on. How is it possible you

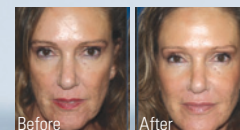

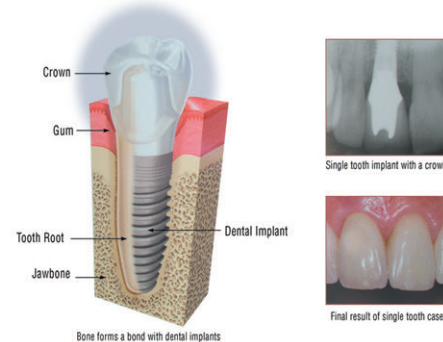

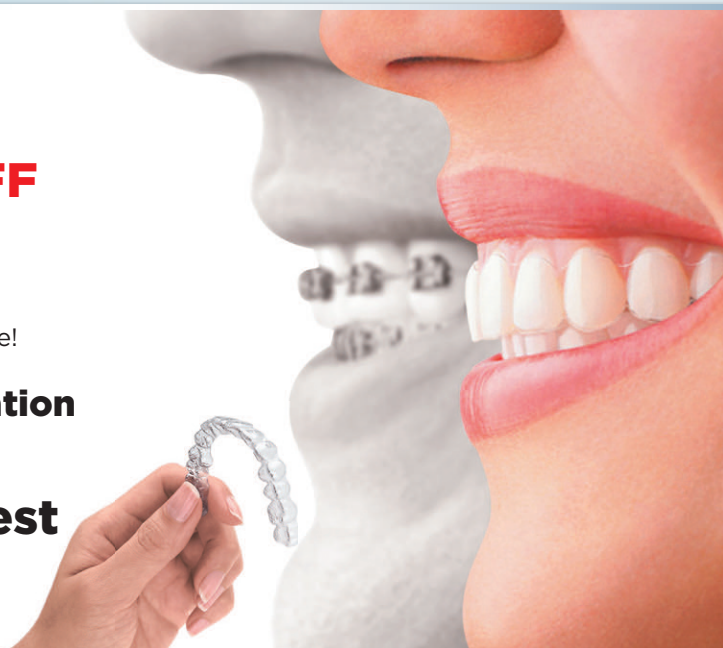

can make a \$150,000 error with a small budget to audit? People said, 'Are you doing something weird?' Aguilera contends that, in any event, the district's alleged fiscal failings are a red herring. "The county doesn't care; they just want to take over. It's power. They want control of everything."

As things stand, the county provides a water truck and \$30,000 for

each station for maintenance. According to Cal Fire spokesperson Sarah Gordon, Julian's decision to opt out of the county scheme won't change things. But Aguilera maintains that county officials have threatened to withdraw support, saying, in effect, "If you don't come with us, we're pulling everything out and you're on your own."

"That's a good question," says Aguilera. "When we had the Cedar Fire, we had

local companies going out, assisting with the full-size strike teams that were here. It was very heart-rending, because you would actually come onto a road, see three or four structures on fire, and one of them happened to be your house. Are you going to save *your* house — or your neighbor's house? Firefighters saved others' houses, but let their own houses burn. There's some emotional attachment to having your own folks there. When these big fires happen in rural country, the bottom line is that you're not gonna be able to save everybody's house. You just learn that. You might be on your own."

Aguilera admits, "There are a lot of nuances to this. For instance, if I have volunteers doing the work, I expect that they're gonna be trained, that they're gonna be in halfway decent shape. We have a lot of guys who are good enough to do flagging. They're nice enough to volunteer. They're old-timers like myself, but maybe they're not capable of going into a structure; maybe they don't have all

somebody there.' They're gonna man it with Cal Fire." As for the locals, he laments, "They'll still have the ability to participate, but [noting the stricter physical-fitness requirements for paid firefighters] under a whole different set of circumstances."

Dianne Jacob denies that the county's motivation is to usurp local control. "Bringing these agencies under the umbrella of the County Fire Authority is not about grabbing power, it's about further minimizing the damage to people and property when disaster hits. I want to stress, however, that the final decision on consolidation rests with each community, not the county."

As to whether the Julian volunteers can do a better job, Aguilera is equivocal. "I don't know. That's up to you. Is it better to have a volunteer fire department or one that's paid? I'm not saying that the county coming in is the worst thing in the world; I'm just saying it's worthwhile to have a discussion about it. I talked to the Cal Fire captain just yesterday and his opinion is, 'Let Cal Fire take it over. If I was livin' here, that's what I'd like. You get better manning, better training, better equipment.' So, there's a variety of ways to look at this. There's also a lot of discussion about this power play."

Jack Shelper, president of the board of directors of the Julian-Cuyamaca Fire Protection District, did not respond to a request for comment on this story. ■

and congestion around Old Town, especially the transit center should be addressed before any new projects, especially a reconfiguration of Interstate 5, occur. "[San Diego Association of Governments] doesn't touch on Old Town. The agency has been evasive and I don't know if they haven't thought about it or they don't want to let us know what their plan is," says Coe during an April 19 interview.

"Something needs to be done. There's already too much traffic funneling through Taylor Street. Just look at any home game; whether it's the Padres or the Chargers, it's a mess at those railroad and trolley crossings. Cars are parked in residential neighborhoods. My opinion is that it will only get worse."

The worries from residents such as Coe prompted the community planning group to draft a formal letter to the regional planning agency and the city. "Over the last decade Old Town has experienced several community planning issues, each of which touch upon a common theme: regional circulation planning," reads the letter. "To accommodate the increased traffic from the projected build-out, Destination Lindbergh incorporates expanded freeway access onto the North-South Interstate 5 freeway, but it does not incorporate capacity plans for its equally necessary expanded freeway access onto the East-West Interstate 8."

If such a ramp goes in, community planners say, it would wipe out several of San Diego's historical landmarks. "Major flaws with such a connector ramp include the destruction of the 1769 Birthplace of California and negative impacts to Presidio Park and the San Diego Presidio National Historic Monument.... Such a connector would destroy the site of Kosa'aay (Cosoy), the 1769

Kumeyaay village that saved the Portola expedition from starvation."

To prevent this from occurring, planning-group members want the city to host public workshops before any environmental documents are drafted. But a spokesperson from San Diego Association of Governments denies any claim that the agency plans to build connector ramp near Old Town.

"There is no plan in Destination Lindbergh or in any related airport access planning to build a connector ramp through Old Town between Pacific Highway or [Interstate 5] to [Interstate 8]," wrote Helen Gao in an April 18 email. "To improve access to the airport and downtown, [San Diego Association of Governments] is studying potential ramps to and from the north between [Interstate 5] and Pacific Highway."

Gao says the residents are jumping the gun by assuming that the airport will be reconfigured to face the north. The San Diego Airport Authority has not made the final decision. "Terminal One may stay on the south side adjacent to Harbor Drive."

As for the busy freeway interchange, a number of improvements are already in the pipeline and are included in the "2050 Regional Transportation Plan" adopted back in 2011. ■

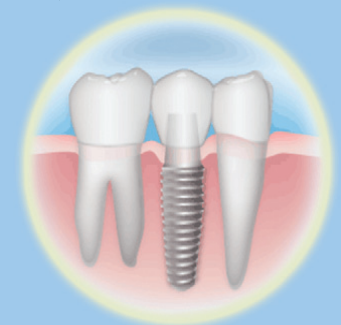

What got Filner into trouble

Analysis of the mayor's personality

San Diego — I have spoken with a lot of people with inside knowledge of what has happened to mayor Bob Filner. Here are some facts:

(1) He is rough on people who work for him but rougher on women than men. He has admitted as much.

(2) He is flirtatious and makes sexual suggestions that are out of line.

(3) While he was running for the job, he was warned by more than one person that his sexual aggressiveness could bring him down; he ignored the advice.

(4) When in the office, his temper has sometimes gotten out of control, as has his tendency to make sexual suggestions.

(5) His chief of staff, the now-resigned Vince Hall, should have been a buffer between Filner and the staff. Hall was not. He exacerbated the problem.

(6) Filner ignored people who should have been his friends. Lawyer Cory Briggs tried to warn Filner's senior aides that the handling of the Sunroad matter was wrong. Briggs was ignored and became one of the three who demanded Filner's resignation.

(7) While she was serving as Filner's consultant on open government, Donna Frye didn't have the latitude to pursue her passion. When she left, he failed to reach out to her. She, like Briggs, became one of the three to demand his resignation.

(8) Filner spent 20 years in Washington, D.C., where sexual suggestiveness and banter is much more tolerated than it is in San Diego; he did not adjust to the new culture.

Bottom line: Filner has promised to reform. Changing personality that quickly is a tall order, but he must do it if he is to survive. And he is the person for the job. He was elected because he saw what was wrong in San Diego: the neighborhoods and infrastructure were being ignored while money was hogged downtown. He is the only one who can curb the power of the downtown corporate welfare faction. To do this, he must shape up.

The Republicans and Democrats who want to replace him — Faulconer, DeMaio, Fletcher, Gloria, et al. — would reverse the progress already made. Filner's new aide, Tony Buckles, served him in Washington and knows him well. His appointment appears to be a good step.

Still a risk

Activist says stored

nuclear fuel poses threats
San Onofre — Although power is no longer being generated at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station, the plant still remains a potential trillion-dollar problem, warns anti-nuclear activist Ace Hoffman.

At issue is roughly 1400 tons of highly radioactive spent nuclear fuel accumulated from decades' worth of generation at the plant's two reactors, which remains stored onsite indefinitely.

With the site of San Onofre sitting on or near several earthquake faults, in a coastal setting potentially vulnerable to tsunamis, and within 50 miles of 8.7 million residents, Hoffman raises concern over dry-cask storage, essentially a system of encasing nuclear waste within lead, steel, and

concrete.

While the casks are touted as a temporary storage solution, a long-term nuclear-waste facility is at least three decades from development, and the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission has planned for the waste to sit along the California coast for up to 600 years.

"They might as well say it's forever," writes Hoffman in a recently published article.

"During that time, however long it is, the spent fuel will not be secured against terrorist attacks with satchel charges or rocket-propelled grenades — or depleted-uranium spears dropped from balloons, for that matter. These containments just aren't that good," Hoffman continues, also raising concerns about the possibilities of air or rail crashes nearby breaking the seal on one or more of the vessels.

Arguing that transportation issues will only become more complex as time passes and the casks weaken, Hoffman says the search for a more suitable storage location (with improved security and a greater distance from population centers and potential

natural disasters) should begin immediately — even if another "temporary" home is found that could in all likelihood become permanent.

Fletcher for Filner?

Democratic rainmaker calls for possible replacement

San Diego — **Christine Forester**, listed by *Newsweek* magazine as the nation's second biggest "bundler" of contributions to the 2008 campaign of president Barack Obama, having collected more than \$500,000 from a variety of friends and associates in that year alone, is spearheading a behind-the-scenes effort to draft newly minted Democrat and ex-GOP assemblyman Nathan Fletcher for mayor if incumbent Bob Filner falters in his effort to remain in office.

get Fletcher into the mayor's race was still preliminary and dependent on when and whether Filner leaves office.

Woman says Filner kissed her without consent

"I thought he was making a joke and I told him that I knew he had a very attractive fiancée. He then repeated that he would like to go out with me. He never

acknowledged my comment about his fiancée. He then said he would like to kiss me. I did not acknowledge him. He leaned over and kissed me anyway. I got up

and left."

The woman says she told some friends about the incident but chose to not file a formal complaint. She decided to come forward after hearing allegations from other women.

The statement is the first detailed account to come to light since attorneys Cory Briggs and Marco Gonzalez and former councilmember Donna Frye came forward with the allegations in letters to Filner and at a July 11 press conference.

Update: The woman provided attorney Cory Briggs with a sworn affidavit, according to a story by KPBS.

A lynching until proven otherwise

Press conference stirs the pot — more questions than answers

Downtown — I was not at the press conference this morning (July 15), at which Donna Frye, Cory Briggs, and Marco Gonzalez claimed to bring out more details on why Mayor Filner should resign because of sexual harassment. But it was described to me by people who were there — one a virulent Filner opponent — and I read the account in the U-T, although, of course, I was suspicious that it was slanted against Filner.

The bottom line is that no so-called victims came forward. No names of victims were revealed. No

cases have been filed. No one can be deposed under oath about the truth of these charges. Gonzalez says he may file a suit against the city for Filner's alleged activities. But consider: Gonzalez stirred the pot, publicly claiming at two press conferences that the mayor has sexually harassed persons and brought in an ex-councilmember (Frye) to agree with him. Then he said he will file suit on behalf of the so-called victims. He has already prejudged the case. It seems to me that it is improper.

It also seems to me that Donna Frye, someone whom I respect greatly, should have known better. And when protesters carried signs saying that Filner

deserves due process, she stated that he has already received due process. She certainly knew better than to say that. There is no due process until the so-called victims can be questioned under oath. Were they harassed, and then warned Filner not to do it again, and he continued to do it? That is key to many of these cases.

Meanwhile, there is a reliable rumor that Filner is reaching out to the downtown corporate welfare boosters in an attempt to get their support. He is, according to this rumor — and it is strictly a rumor — going to Democrats who play ball with the downtown establishment. If Filner changes his stripes, that would be a

disaster for San Diego.

Greek Islands on the cheap

Although prices have increased dramatically since Greece joined the European Union, there's still something magical about islands like Santorini and Milos. How much you spend on airfare to get there depends on the time of year as well as from where the flight originates.

The cheapest flights are from the U.S. to Western Europe; from there you can take a budget flight to Greece. Once you arrive in Athens, travel to the islands via the ferries is cheap and relaxing, with snack bars, restaurants, and beautiful scenery.

The main port in Athens, Piraeus, is easily accessed by metro or train from

almost anywhere in the city. The metro is efficient, and trains run from 6 a.m. to midnight. At Piraeus, book your ticket to the Greek island of your choice. Most travelers recommend the Blue Star, Anek, or Megajet ferries.

And make sure you have ample time to return to Athens before your scheduled airport departure — it's better to stay an extra day in Athens than miss your flight.

Patience is a virtue when it comes to the Greek ferry system. Ferry travel is not recommended on Sundays when Greeks return to the mainland after the week-end. If you have limited time — such as a week or ten days — going to two islands will give you plenty of time to explore without feeling rushed.

As far as accommodations go, some recommend that you book reservations online, while others say you get better prices once you arrive on the island, as price is often negotiable. On Santorini and Milos, you can find dorm-style rooms or hostels for around \$15+, depending on the time of year.

Santorini is the destination of choice for first-time visitors to the Islands. Scenery here will set the mood for the

duration of your trip, so spend at least two days. Many travelers recommend the Katefiani Villas bed and breakfast, located in the quiet, pretty black-sand beach town of Perissa.

Arriving at Santorini's New Port, it's a 15-minute drive along the cliffs to the center of the city. For the adventurous, donkeys, cable-car rides, and walking are options to get to the Old Port.

If you have time, visit Santorini's neighbor, Amorgos, with its gorgeous whitewashed monastery perched on a cliff that descends into the green and blue sea.

The volcanic island of Milos, with its lunar landscape of multihued rocks, has about 70 colorful red, white, gold, and gray beaches with rugged mountain settlements and whitewashed fishing villages. Niki Savvas Rooms & Studios in the quiet Pollonia neighborhood on

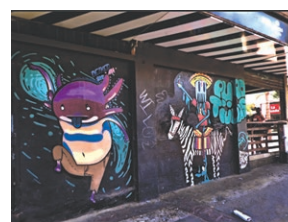
Milos are highly recommended, with a five-minute walk to shops, the bus stop, taverns, and bakeries. The port of Ademas has a good selection of eateries, and there are excavations going on all over the island. Be sure to visit the site where the Venus de Milo statue was found.

MT. GOWER OPEN SPACE PRESERVE — SOUTH ROUTE

Unusual rock formations, views, and a variety of landscapes and habitats make this one of the better hikes in the county.



Distance from downtown San Diego: 40–45 miles. Allow one hour. Via I-8 and SR 67N: turn east (right) on Willow Road and then north (left) to Wildcat Canyon Road. After 12 miles, turn right on San Vicente Road and then after 1.7 miles, turn left onto Gunn Stage Road. Drive 1.9 miles to the end of the road and park. Via Ramona: turn south on 10th Street, which becomes San Vicente Road. Drive 5.5 miles and turn left on Gunn Stage Road. Drive 1.9 miles to the end of the road and park. **Hiking length:** Up to 12 miles round trip if hike begins from the parking area at the end of Gunn Stage Road. Shorter distances possible. **Difficulty:** Strenuous because of the distance and undulating trails. Starting elevation is about 1700 feet, and maximum elevation is about 2693. Facilities and water at the staging area only. It can be hot and dry. Carry at least a gallon of water and trail snacks. Trekking poles recommended. Trail open to equestrians, mountain bikers, and leashed dogs.



Three hoodoo rock formations dominate the landscape

The 1574-acre Mt. Gower Open Space Preserve has recovered nicely from the 2003 Cedar Fire that raged through the area. It remains a pristine wilderness

area offering a variety of habitats, including oak woodlands with seasonal streams, isolated mountain meadows, and chaparral-covered hillsides. There is also the chal-

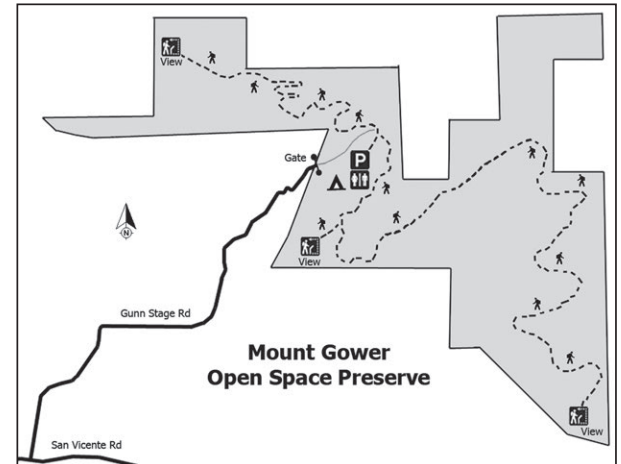
lenge of climbing to the 3103 summit of Mt. Gower, which can be an alternate to hiking to the southernmost viewpoint in the preserve. Mt. Gower is actually east of the preserve, in the Cleveland National Forest, but accessible from the preserve trail.

Note that the county map for this open space advertises 8 miles of trails within the preserve. However, the actual mileage one hikes is much further. Indicated mileage does not include the half-mile walk from the parking area to the trail junction, where preserve miles begin, nor does it accurately reflect the distance to the southern viewpoint. Plan on a long hike of about 12 miles round trip from your car to the southernmost viewpoint or

shorten the hike by turning back after viewing the hoodoo rock formations on the granite slabs below Mt. Gower. The views from the higher elevations are also spectacular.

From the information kiosk in the staging area, follow the trail to the junction, then head right (or south). At mile 0.93 from the junction are two large boulders that lean against each other, forming a teepee-like structure known as Teepee Rock. A bench and shade are here. Predominant plants in this area include buckwheat, chamise, and sugar bush. The short view trail from Teepee Rock will add a half-mile to your hike. From this peaklet are views of San Vicente Valley and the San Diego Country Estates. Benches are also here. From Teepee Rock, the trail dips into Swartz Canyon, where coast live oak, willow, and sycamore trees provide shade. Poison oak and wild cucumber are also here. When climbing out of the canyon, notice both white sage and black sage along the trail as well as nolina, laurel sumac, ceanothus, manzanita, and scrub oak. There is plenty of coyote scat visible along the trail, displaying the fact that they eat manzanita berries.

The trail continues to wind along the ridges and comes to the first of two meadows. Cross the meadow climbing up to a rock shelf to the upper meadow. The real attraction here is the unusual rock formations butt-



ing into the air. Note the great variety of lichen and moss found on the rock slabs. Lichen is a mutualistic symbiotic association of a fungus with an algae and or a cyanobacterium. The fungus provides an environment through attachment to the rocks and protection from elements for its partner(s) that provide the food via carbohydrates by photosynthesis.

Reach the top of Mt. Gower either by climbing east across the granite slabs and scramble to the top of the southernmost ridge or continue following the trail for another 1.5 miles to the 2300-foot peak for another overview of San Diego Country Estates. Follow the trail back to the parking area.

Animals that may be seen in

the preserve include coyote, mule deer, raccoons, foxes, and bobcats. Common birds include ravens, California thrashers, scrub jays, lesser goldfinches, and red-tailed hawks.

Best time to visit the preserve is November through April, when it is cooler for hiking. The preserve is open 8 a.m. to sunset. If hiking later in the season, pick a cloud-covered day or come early in the morning.

Canyoneers are San Diego Natural History Museum volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks that teach appreciation for the great outdoors. For a schedule of free public hikes, refer to the San Diego Natural History Museum website.

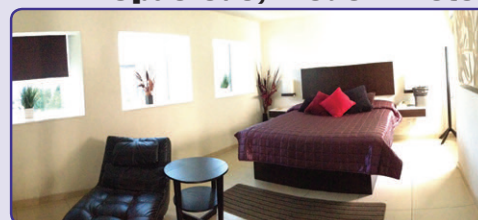

Car-rental shops and scooters are available on most islands. Scooters are the preferred mode of transportation, as they're cheap and easy to park. There's often a good chance your hotel or hostel will offer discounts on a car or scooter rental company. Public buses are a cheap transportation option, too, although they tend to be slow.

Get acquainted with local shop owners and you might get recommendations on where to save money. Free hiking trails abound on most islands. Each of the 28 Greek islands is completely different from the other, so do research to get the most out of your trip and save money.

The islands can be pricey if you plan to shop and eat out, so make sure your accommodations include

a stovetop or kitchen — you'll save money by shopping at the local grocery store and packing leftovers for the beach. The cheapest menu options are sandwiches/gyros. You might get tired of them after a couple of days, but they are great budget-extenders. Fruit, vegetables, and yogurt are very cheap on the islands, too.

Additionally, most hotel rooms provide refrigerators, and alcohol bought in supermarkets is much cheaper than in restaurants and bars.

The best month to visit is the month of October, the end of the "summer" season in the islands and when prices drop significantly. Nights may be somewhat crisp, but the daytime's typically great for swimming and other activities. July and August are the two months to avoid European vacationers who come to the islands in droves.

What are you reading?

"I've read two books lately that my wife turned me on to: *The Glass Castle*, by Jeannette Walls, and *Half-Broke Horses*, which is also by Walls. *The Glass Castle* is a memoir about her life growing up; she started out in Arizona — which is also where my wife grew up — with a pretty dysfunctional family. She ends up as a famous TV interviewer for NBC or something — I don't watch TV, so I don't remember that part. The mom and dad were just wild characters."

Give me an example.

"In the opening scene, she's three years old, and she's making her own lunch, cooking hot dogs on the stove. She's wearing a tutu, and she got caught on fire. Her mother was the kind of person to let her three-year-old daughter do that. And it just goes on from there."

Were the parents drunks?

"Yeah, there's drinking, and there are family issues."

Is Walls working out her troubles by sharing her story?

"It's a story of how she just overcame. She was never bitter against her parents. She never accuses them. It's all just matter-of-fact. They were basically homeless when she was in high school. After lunch, she had to rummage through the trash. It's like that all the way through her childhood. Later on, as she got older, she started maybe seeing why there were problems."

How did it leave you?

"It was inspiring. Just seeing how you can have circumstances come your way and handle them. It made me think about being a parent and seeing how things... seeing what I would do differently than they did."

Excerpt from *The Glass Castle*: "I lived in a world that at any moment could erupt into fire. It was the sort of knowledge that kept you on your toes."

What about Half-Broke Horses?

"Her mother grew up on a ranch in the '30s and '40s, out in the middle of nowhere in Arizona. Walls wanted to write a book about that, but her mother said, 'You ought to write about my mother.' So the book takes place around 1900. It's a biography, but she calls it a true-life novel. The grandmother had the same kind of situation. She was pretty much on her own, and she kind

of raised her brother and sister more than the parents did. She went on to become a teacher, and she loved to fly airplanes, and she worked on this ranch."

Does learning about the grandmother give Walls insight?

"Yes."

Tell me about the writing.

"It's very descriptive — you're with them. But it's never a boring amount of detail. The books always start with a significant scene, and *Half-Broke Horses* starts with a scene where they're living in West Texas and she's a little girl, and there's a big flood. She saves her brother and

sister by climbing this tree. You get the real sense that you were in that storm; you feel the storm coming, and then this flood comes. That kind of thing."

Do you read any magazines or newspapers?

"I read the *L.A. Times* every day, mostly online."

How many articles?

"Three or four."

Do you read them to the end?

"No, not anymore. I used to, though."

Why did you stop?

"On the computer, it's not the same. In the old days, you would wake up every morning before work, and you had the paper, and it was... I feel like back ten, twenty years ago — I don't know if this is true, but I felt like I was getting more of a story, a real, true story. Now, I don't know."

San Diego Reader: How long do you spend writing your sermon?

Pastor Barry Mahler: For preparation, I find that — apart from prayer and general studies — I only spend a few hours on any one sermon, which is far less than I used to. The longer I preach through the Scriptures, the more I learn the truth of Hebrews 4:2, which

says that the word of God is living. I find Scripture has a remarkable ability to teach itself. That takes the pressure off me to wow or amaze or come up with amazing original insight. I consider every passage I go through and find the message I was meant to give to my congregation just jumps out at me.

SDR: What is your favorite subject on which to preach?

PM: In recent years I've been impressed with the concept of the image of God expressed in Genesis 1:26–27. The first mention of humanity was done in conjunction with the first mention of the image of God, which makes the image of God the fundamental fact

of our existence; that idea of the image of God is behind everything that moves the human heart heavenward.

SDR: What is your main concern as a member of the clergy?

PM: There are so many who profess a faith in Christ and allegiance to his word — but who care so little for his word. That large-scale biblically illiterate Christianity is reducing Christianity to irrelevancy and impotency. I try to be tireless in teaching from the word of God. I don't like self-promotion, but I have a blog [*nuclearpastor.com*] that I try to discuss biblical worldview issues from, and I just finished a book I've been working on for the last seven and a half

years on the word of God.

SDR: Why did you become a minister?

PM: It was in the early to mid '90s, and I was mind-ing my own business, having a good time running the nuclear power plants at San Onofre. I made the mistake of volunteering to teach a Bible study at my church, and from the first moment I began teaching a Bible study, it seemed I had come home. The idea of being a servant of God's word and of God in ministering the gospel to his people just captured my heart from that moment on, and I couldn't ever escape it.

SDR: Where do you go when you die?

PM: As for me, I'll be going

to heaven. I don't deserve to, but that's the promise of my savior and he backed up that promise with the power of his indestructible life and the shedding of his perfect sacrificial blood for me. I am a saved beggar bound

for glory, and I thank him for that. There are other options. There is a place known as hell, created for the devil and his angels, and it was created precisely for that purpose. All those who reject the free offer of salvation in Christ choose that option. In denying wanting to spend an eternity with God, they choose to spend an eternity apart from everything that God is — everything that is good, noble, just, wonderful, fair, honorable, and true. Hell is a place where none of those things exist.

Wood pallet house debuts as gallery

In the southeast hills of Tijuana, at the top of a harrowing Saturno Street in a neighborhood aptly named Planetario, lies a boxy, minimal-modern house called Casa GS.

A project of renowned Tijuana architect Jorge Gracia, Casa GS was constructed on a shoestring budget by making use of available and repurposed materials such as concrete, glass, steel, drywall, and wood.



Casa GS hosted international pop-up show July 18-21

the structural bore-holes lend the illusion of knots. To debut Casa GS

before the owners move in, Los Angeles-based curator Steve Turner Contemporary hosted a pop-up exhibition July 18-21 called Art Baja Tijuana, featuring work by eight international artists from L.A., New York, Mexico City, and T.J.

"Gracia believes that architectural design is enhanced when architects work closely with builders and craftsmen," the event page reads.

"In that spirit, he manages every aspect of his projects until the last detail is finished, including custom designed furniture. He also uses reclaimed materials from his past projects, reusing them in new construction.... With his use of easily accessible

materials, Gracia has something in common with several of the artists in ABTJ. Pablo Rasgado, for example, often uses materials that he extracts from public spaces. In past works, he has utilized sections of painted walls from busy city streets, remnants of dry-wall from temporary exhibitions at museums, and common books that he has found within a city."

Baca Lopez signs her artwork with a pair of X's. The glyphs, to her, symbolize the love that inspires all her work, as well as "the here and now." They appear in large form on her major canvas works, which evoke the spirit of Miro, Picasso, and Dalí.

She signs her "pop-up positivity" series with the XX. Wildly different from the expressive colorways of her larger pieces, the pop-

ups resemble Tumblr posts or internet memes, a fine artist's version of the image macro. Baca Lopez paints words and phrases that range from the irreverent ("loosen thy grip of the chicken") to the inspiring ("spend time among the flowers") to the adorable ("I love you more than bacon").

Fans of *The Real World San Diego* might remember seeing a few of Baca Lopez's paintings on the show. The MTV art department loved one of her early paintings so

much that they commissioned a set of canvases for the show's set. These days, Baca Lopez tries to match her constant painting with regular shows, aiming for one show a week. ■

Mom's dream

“BBQ shrimp, BBQ pork, fried egg, shredded pork with peanut crumbles, pork sausage slices...”

Sandwich: Buy 2, get 1 free.”
I see this sign when I get off the 44 bus.

It's hanging outside a Vietnamese eatery I hadn't noticed before. Another sign above it reads: “Bale Restaurant & Deli. Vietnamese, Chinese, Thai Cuisine.”

Hmm...we must be talking *bánh mi*, a Vietnamese adaptation of the French baguette sandwich. In the 1800s, when the French colonized Vietnam, they brought their bakeries to Hanoi and filled baguettes as usual with butter and pâté. It wasn't until the Vietnamese shook off the French in 1954 that the “Vietnamization” of *bánh mi* began. They added some heat, made their own mayo mix, and added sweet pickled carrots, cucumber, a bit of soy, and cilantro. So, yes, *bánh mi* are basically western sandwiches, but the flavors are eastern.

Maybe if I bought three, ate one...left two to have later with Carla...?

Now I'm inside. It's 8:00 p.m., one hour before closing. This Vietnamese gal in a pink-and-white version of a French sailor's sweater stands behind the counter. Tina.

“Can I help you?” she asks.

“You have sandwiches?”

I mean, it's like asking someone at McDonald's if they have hamburgers. The *bánh mi* are displayed in photos all along the wall, above a red-and-gold plaque that reads “Khai Truong Hong Phat.” (“Good Luck on the Grand Opening.”)

“We have only been open eight months in this location,” Tina explains, “and which sandwich, please?”

They have dozens of choices, but she suggests that I have one pork, one beef, and one chicken. So I go for the #7, Bánh Mi Xa Xiu, sweet roasted pork. And the #13, BBQ beef. And #5, the BBQ chicken. The BBQ beef is \$3.69, the other two are \$3.39, but like it said on the sign, the third one is free.

So here's where I start to make a simple thing complicated (typical me): while Tina's writing all this down, I can't help asking Tanh, the waiter, if they have anything apart from *bánh mi*.

“Of course,” he says, and swings a big glossy menu book in front of me. Pages and pages of items, each with its own color pic. One or two are given an entire page.

Bottom line, they have this luscious-looking Com Tam Ba Le, which is “Bale's special broken rice dish,” for \$8.99. Broken rice? Seen it mentioned before, but what the heck is it? I wanna try it. Maybe I could sneak this in while they're making the sandwiches, then make a gift of all three *bánh mi* to Carla.

I sit down at a black marble-top table in the corner. Place has lots of windows, cream walls, sandy-colored wainscoting, plus endless photos of non-*bánh mi* dishes served here. I look around. A few people are still eating.

Pretty quick, Tina brings my broken rice. And, man, so much. First thought: this costs \$8.99. In Little Italy, at the Queenstown pub, \$9 buys a single giant pretzel.

I get Tanh to explain what-all I've got. He goes around in a circle, finger-pointing: “BBQ shrimp, BBQ pork, fried egg, shredded pork with peanut crumbles, pork sausage slices, shrimp patty, shrimp-and-ground-pork patty with bean-curd skin, egg loaf, which is a kind of omelet with clear bean-thread noodles, mushrooms, shrimp, pork, and crab, and the salad.”

Now he's talking about the lettuce, tomato, cucumber slices, pickled-carrot shreds, and slices of pickled heart of cabbage that fill about a third of the crowded plate. Plus the chicken soup and the *nuoc mam*, Vietnamese fish sauce. That has carrot and daikon shreds in it. Smells fishy but sweet.

“We prepare everything here,” says Tanh. “Takes a long time. Two cooks.”

I pour that *nuoc mam* all over the barbecued pork pieces and the mound of rice underneath

them, then add red chili and Sriracha sauce in goodly amounts. Then — oh, yes, totally delish — I start munching on white slices of pickled cabbage. Tangy, tart, terribly tasty.

I have to ask Tanh one thing.

“What's the deal about broken rice?”

“Broken rice is very Vietnamese,” he says. “We like it especially with pork.” He says it's rice that's been broken in the milling process — or in the drying-on-roads process — so it's cheaper. It's what ordinary people often eat and get used to. Oh, yeah. This is like what they call rice grits or middlins in, say, Carolina, land of that great Carolina Gold rice. The main thing about broken rice is that it absorbs the flavors of the food and liquids around it better than smooth-skinned whole rice grains. Also, it has a rougher texture.

By now it's almost closing time. Vi, the mom, Tina, the daughter, Trang, another daughter, the other Tina who has been serving me, and the cooks are out and sitting around in the dining room, taking five at the end of the day. Me, I'm attacking the egg loaf. It's dense. Packed with 'shrooms, shrimp, pork, and crab. Almost a meal in itself.

“We were all in a displacement camp in Hong Kong when I was a little girl,” says Trang. She's 21 but looks way younger. “Then they sent us back to Vietnam. We finally made it here, and 13 years ago mom started our first restaurant. It was her dream. We have been in three locations now, all around this Linda Vista Plaza.”

I ask if she's been back to Vietnam since coming to the States.

“Oh, yes. But the trouble is, like, culturally, I've been too whitened. I prefer the American

way now. Back in Da Nang, they're too cocky, strutting, don't want to know other ways. To them I smell different, talk different, act different. Even my relatives saw me as a tourist.”

I'm the last customer to leave. All the staff are leaving with me. Couldn't finish the broken rice, so I put it in with the three *bánh mi* I ordered. Carla's into Vietnamese — I have high hopes.

Later: Carla and I agree that the daikon and cilantro make our sandwiches worthwhile. She has the pork, I have the chicken. So good. Pickled daikon flavors, garlic, a sweet tang. 'Course, no comparison to Bale's broken-rice dish, because, hey, all that variety on one plate? Plus, in the end these *bánh mi* are, well, sandwiches.

But what deals! If it's between these and a giant pretzel... ■

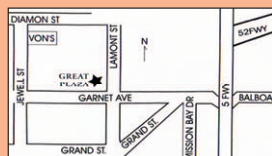

Everything right

Pomegranate Russian Georgian Restaurant's long history has been spotted with ups, downs, rave reviews, and weird moves. There was the time the restaurant (2312 El Cajon Blvd, 619-298-4007) stopped taking credit cards, favoring an ATM in the dining room to encourage cash-only purchases. And then there was Petrushka next door, which eventually merged with Pomegranate and became one restaurant. There have been staff changes aplenty. I hope I'm not getting the details too confused, as it's been a long and winding road. These days, the slimmed-down menu still offers hearty meats and stews, all described with breathless prose and all delicious.

I've eaten about half the menu after many visits to the restaurant and never been let down. The salad dishes do right by vegetarians, offering them greater substance than just a bunch of leafy greens. Try the "vesna" salad — shredded apples and carrots flecked with fresh herbs — or just get the beets. Either way, it's a meal in itself.

Even the main dishes, which seem pricey for humble fare, have amazed me with simplicity and deep, rich flavors: kebabs of chicken and lamb served with rice and chilled salads. Seasoned patties of "meatloaf" sitting atop a potato purée. The bizarre but delicious "Georgian eagle," half a stewed chicken smothered in herbs. Everything has been excellent, even if basic. I am reminded, over and over again, that the world's simplest dishes — from sushi to a good ratatouille to

Pomegranate's stroganoff — can be so great in their austerity.

Pomegranate's atmosphere and style of service elevate the restaurant. It's far from the perfection of fine dining, but I'm hard pressed to think of a place where I've been treated with more courtesy. The vibe can be manic at times. Cheerful Eastern Europeans bounce around the dining room, serving large parties with exaggerated flair. I've always felt a sense of warmth and welcome inside the dining room. Small wonder that the walls are covered in the scrawlings of happy customers from far and wide.

Once, when I walked into the restaurant, I got one of the best greetings of my life.

"Sit down," I heard. "We will feed you!"

That was it. Come on in. Get fed. Get happy. And as I sat there, listening to a pair of talented girls play duets on the piano, I did just that.

The pub that makes its own mustard

Can french fries be a delicious meal on their own?

When they come with habanero hot sauce made with, uh, carrots, and home-made mustard, yes.

I'm sitting up to the counter here at Ritual Tavern with the sun streaming in across 30th Street with this nice pint of Lightning Amber Ale from Poway (\$4 during happy hour) and a cup of parmesan garlic fries.

Yes, they are pretty scrumptious. But they definitely get interesting with the three bottles of sauce that they say Mike the owner has made from scratch. A ketchup that they make from their own tomatoes — and they have them growing right out back in the beer garden — a Cajun vinegar

hot sauce, and this habanero-carrot hot sauce. Also, a home-made mustard...totally delicious.

Turns out, Mike, the owner, is a Linkery alum. So, this locavore thing going on should come as no surprise.

Tell the truth, the food selection isn't the greatest for happy hour. It's these fries (\$4) or a "chef's special hummus" (\$5). That's it. On the main menu, lots of delicious-looking pub food, if you're ready to shell out; like, their "signature" shepherd's pie (with chunks of lamb and beef) for \$15. Or mussels (also \$15).

But what I like here is not just the intimate little bar, but the bits of patio set up all over the place. The biggest surprise is the little beer garden out back. They have heirloom tomatoes on the vine, grapes, passion fruit, herbs. And they're not just for your eyes.

Must come back with a little more lettuce in the pocket.

Meantime, this cup of fries with the garlic tang is gonna have to do.

Soup, soup, and more soup

Trieu Chau Restaurant (4653 University Avenue, 619-280-4204) is named after a Chinese linguistic dialect (commonly transliterated as "Teochow") that's mostly spoken in the province of Fujian. Maybe that doesn't add anything to the experience of eating at the

blue-and-yellow building in City Heights, but it's a nice piece of trivia. Fortunate diners might even get a parking spot in the small lot adjacent to the building!

The expansive menu complicates matters by pulling in Lao and Thai influences, resulting in a convoluted list that runs from stir-fries to duck soup. Meals are cheap, with generous portions costing only \$5-\$7. One could easily fill up on dishes like the pineapple

fried rice, which has more of an American Thai flavor and nice chunks of chicken hiding within.

Really, what diners *should* do is dig into the soups, because Trieu Chau's soups set the restaurant apart. Ornate versions, like the Trieu Chau special, come laden with every kind of meat, from duck to fish balls, swimming in a rich stock. Simpler dishes, like the duck soup with rice noodles, just let smooth broth and savory meat speak for themselves. The soup is like pho, but the base is lighter and less boldly spiced. With an order of fried bread (\$2) on the side, a bowl of soup at Trieu Chau is perfect for a light dinner. Lunch might serve as the best meal for Trieu Chau, since the hot soups are light enough that they don't inspire instant naptime, as would a heavier meal.

Like most Chinese restaurants, Trieu Chau has agglutinated different cuisines and crafted something interesting from the result. It's certainly a *different* Chinese restaurant than the average takeout joint — the "pig's intestine" soup makes sure of that!

"Have one." It's Luciano. He's sitting with a bucketful of Dos Equis. I've just sat up at the bar. He's at the next table, under the bulletin board scattered with pictures of past parties here.

He's already opening a bottle for me, so, hey,

I transfer to his table. This is around five in the afternoon. All around us, guys, mainly, are drinking a few, singing along with the karaoke, playing pool, dancing with some gal, going outside to order tacos from Carlo, who's got his taco cart in what used to be the driveway. Ranchero music.

"I work seven days a week, two jobs each day, landscaping," Luciano says. "But sometimes I need to get away from my lawnmower." He's from Guatemala, sends money back to his parents. Doesn't have an easy life. Doesn't have any social life, outside of rare visits to places like here, he says.

This is what I love about Chiquibaby's. It's a little bar on this little street you wouldn't notice in a thousand years. Dewey Street, in Logan Heights, not far from 25th and Commercial.

I was in here in February, later at night. Kinda different crowd, but still cracking those pool balls, lots of laughs and quaffing of beers. The whole family who owns this was working the tables and kitchen and bar. They gave it a neighborhood feel.

Lorena comes over. I figure the best way I can do my part

is to order some food. Pretty soon she's sitting down, talking with Luciano.

Choice is pretty simple: a taco from Carlo (\$1.50), *tostada de ceviche* from the kitchen (\$2.99), shrimp cocktail (\$5.99), or a bag of tostilocos (\$3.99).

No contest...okay, contest. I end up getting an adobada taco, tostilocos, and the tostada. The tostilocos — the Tostito bag cut open and filled with chopped up cucumber and *cueritos* — pork skin strips, and *chacachaca* — spiced tamarind — is the winner. Just can't get enough of that *cueritos*-Dos Equis combination.

"Sometimes you need company," says Luciano. "Doing this work, sending money to my parents, it takes all your time, and it's lonely."

Together, we can't finish what I ordered. I leave Luciano and Lorena to it. I see she's good at making her customers feel included. I leave Luciano to his moment away from his tough life.

Fat Sandwiches

Rumors of Fat Sal's Deli (956 Garnet Avenue, 855-682-4373) percolated up to me some

time ago, but my perambulations kept me away for far too long. Looking at the menu, I constructed an ideal of the "fat sandwiches." In my head, the sandwiches were of an impossible size and loaded with burgers, cheesesteaks, chicken fingers, mozzarella sticks, fries, onion rings, and any other greasy foods the deli workers could fry and stuff between two slices of bread.

In reality, the fat sandwiches (\$8.95) were much more manageable. The eponymous "Fat Sal" gave Carnitas' Snack Shack's poutine a run for its money, at least in terms of meat and gravy overload. A significant base of roast beef hid beneath a fistful of soggy fries, some onion rings, and a few mozzarella sticks. Mayonnaise and gravy drenched the entire creation.

For a "Fat Anthony," they took a normal Italian sub (salami, lettuce, dressing, etc.) and jammed chicken fingers, mozzarella sticks, fries, and marinara sauce in.

I know. That sounds like a disgusting overload. Nobody said the fat sandwiches were pretty. They're not. But the fact of the matter is that they put a little of everything in these

sandwiches. They are excessive, but not overly so. Except for the "Big Fat Fatty," that is. The \$50, 27-inch monstrosity challenges foolhardy diners to eat the whole thing in 40 minutes. Finish it and you get to dream up a new fat sandwich for the menu.

Anybody in search of a less opulent sandwich (although, why??) can pick from a series of "normal" hoagies, heroes, wraps, and burgers at reasonable (\$4-\$7) prices.

Other nice touches include a spacious patio and long hours. The deli stays open until 4am some nights, so the "Fat Mona," which has bacon, sausage, and eggs on it, starts to look pretty good about then. To drink, Fat Sal's has the ultimate soda fountain, which employs a touch screen and allows custom flavoring of Coke products. Lime/vanilla Coke? Why not? Adventurous gluttons might go for a "fat shake" (\$5.95 and "don't even think about trying to use a straw over here!"), which might include peanut butter, marshmallow fluff, peanuts, and sea salt in addition to the ice cream.

Hungry yet?

Cheap, cheerful Inca-chew

I was walking up through Old Town Plaza when I noticed this freshly whitewashed adobe place down by the Fiesta de Reyes part. Next to a silversmith joint. The Old Town House of Jerky Root Beer (2754 Calhoun Street, in the Old Town Plaza, 619-292-5629).

Turns out they have nearly two dozen stores scattered all over the country.

I hop in for a snack. Also curious about the whole jerky thing. Oh, Lord. So many jerkies, so little time. Buffalo, alligator, elk, kangaroo...

Seems it used to be the only meat you could actually take with you that didn't rot, especially if you were someone like Lewis or Clark. And I see the brand is "Oregon Trail."

The gal, Chelsea, says it'd be good to start off with plain ol' beef, perhaps a sweet and spicy, and then maybe a habanero, for kick. And then to tamper it all down with a root beer. They have dozens of root beers — like, 47 brands. "People are very particular about their root beers,"

Chelsea says. "It's about flavor. Also, where they're from."

I pick Virgil's (\$2.32) just because she says it comes from L.A. and has been going since 1916.

Head out to the patio, open the jerkies.

The Sweet and Spicy (\$1.99) gives you a little tingle, but it's the salty sweetness that comes through. And it's not rip-your-teeth-out jerky you usually think of. And, wow, the habanero (\$1.99) is good and hot. The root beer helps.

Turns out jerky has a heck of a history. The word comes from the Spanish word "charqui," which comes from the Incans' Quechua word "ch'arki," which means "to burn."

The whole secret was to cut fresh-killed meat into thin strips, dry them in the sun as quick as possible, and with the help of salt, keep the bacteria out. They say it's the oldest way of preserving meat.

So is it a meal? Three or four stick's'd certainly fill you up, but no, we're in snack territory.

Still, it's kinda nice to think you're tapping in to a stove-off-starvation aid your great-great grand folks probably chewed on at the mouth of their cave.

Wild life behind the batting cage

It's open, at last. Southpaw Social Club (815 J Street, 619-269-2255) has only been in business a few days but seems to have struck the right note among those wild and crazy East Villagers.

Where El Vitral (which this pub-eatery has replaced) was usually half-filled with lawyers and out-of-town guests, it always seemed, at happy hour (four to seven, Monday to Friday), the place is nicely packed with a bunch of condoistas and the fixie bike crowd.

You take your pick from the balcony with the great green views of the park at Petco Park, to the row of sidewalk tables out front on J, to the great little caged side area with cushiony astroturf, plus comfy chairs, a fire, and a lively crowd.

For starters, you get welcomed outside by Antoinette, the gal with the fab gold earrings.

Me, I'm at the bar, ordering a \$5 happy-hour half-pint of Stone Barleywine and looking at the menu. Decor's kinda industrial. High, rusty corrugated iron ceiling, raw saplings tied together to form a shelter over the bar.

"El Vitral was okay, but it was just too expensive for people who

live and work around here," Carlos, the guy next to me, is saying. He says he came for the opening last Friday. Now he's back again. So it has to be doing something right.

Not that this is greasy-spoon cheap. You're going to pay \$11 for the steak burger or a polenta pie, \$9 for a chicken soup, more for mains: like, \$19 for Red Eye Pork tenderloin with fruit chutney.

But Nino, the muscled bartender, says all grilled flatbreads are \$4 off during happy hour. That's \$9 instead of \$13.

So, lessee, flatbreads: Chicken on Fire, Rat-a-tat-tat (basically ratatouille), St. Louis, with provolone cheese, 'shrooms, sausage, shaved beef.... Then there's funky pear (poached pears with blue cheese, candied walnuts), Pig and Fig, basically bacon and fig, and the Wild Shroom: cheese, prosciutto ham, and roasted 'shrooms.

"I had the fig and pig on Friday," says Carlos. "Kinda sweet. Good."

That's what I end up getting. It's this big, oval, crispy flatbread loaded with arugula, and underneath, gruyere cheese, caramelized fennel, onions, the bacon and shiny slabs of fig. Spare, light, tasty. I mean, yes, it's what you're seeing everywhere from Queenstown (in Little Italy) to Prep Kitchen to, like, Craft and Commerce (okay, also in LI). I guess it's the locavore thing.

Good, though.

I did right, choosing the barley wine to drink with it, all swoopy and sweet. It goes perfectly with the fig flavors and that little hint of fennel. You feel you're eating something healthy, too.

It's too early to tell if this place is going to take. So far, signs are good. This ex-warehouse part of town it's in, just beyond the Gaslamp, well south of Market, not quite in East Village, gives you the feeling the area's still a sleeping giant, but just starting to wake up.

"I'll miss the apple fritters," sighs Suzie. She's a guide with Old Town Trolley Tours, the green-and-orange antique buses that you see hauling around with tourists hanging out of their open sides.

We're standing outside the Old Town Market Café, right next to the trolley's ticket booth (at 4010 Twiggs Street, Old Town). Instead of the bright carrot-top figure of Jason West behind the counter, it's just a rolled-down screen of beige canvas.

"He closed last Friday," says another trolley guy, David, known as "The Chef." "Lot of people will miss him. He did really good coffee."

Me, too. Jason was my go-to guy when it came to coffee, and his tarragon chicken salad wraps? Beautiful. White chicken meat, celery, almonds, parsley, tarragon, and romaine lettuce, all wrapped in a thin flour tortilla. Totally delicious, \$4.99. That, plus a Dirty Chai, a chai latte with a shot of espresso (\$4).

Who to blame? The Bermuda Triangle, of course.

"It's weird, really weird," Jason told me last January. "But right here, at the entrance to the State Park parking, between the theater and me, we have countless fender benders. Just in this little part of Twiggs. And people get lost. I have people coming up and asking, 'Where are we? Is this Old Town?' They seem to enter a dream warp. Then a few yards out and they're themselves again. Everybody who works here notices it."

Could it be the Triangle has struck again? After all, Whaley House, Campo Santo ain't far away.

"This is where we kind of get together before we take our tours out," says the Chef. "Now where are we going to get our coffee?"

the kicker? This family standing around their kid in a stroller chowing away at their fresh, hot slabs running with butter just make it all look so messy and delish.

The kid below doesn't look too happy at being left out, but for the grown-ups it's lush eating.

"Gotta have it hot and fresh," says one of them. "They're the best."

The two ladies, Elida and Francisca, are pounding out the product.

I order two corn with butter. Then, what the heck, a strawberry and chocolate (flour).

"I first started here 24 years ago," says Francisca. Pancha. "One year before Elida."

They've been standing here ever since, flipping, rolling, putting on a show in front of crowds.

"Americans like flour, Mexicans always get corn tortillas," says Elida.

Hmm. That's probably why we gringos are more *gordo*.

"Back then, 24 years ago, you got four tortillas for a dollar," says Pancha. "Then it was three. Now it's two."

She laughs. "Better buy now, before it goes to one."

I do. Two steaming-hot, fresh-rolled corn tortillas. I add butter and salsa.

And, what the heck, a chocolate and a strawberry. Flour.

Two bucks. Deal.

I watch Elida slap down four little rolls of dough, grab the rolling pin, flatten them out into pretty perfect discs, and throw them like frisbees onto the hot plate.

"We make maybe 1000 of these a day," says Elida. "You

get used to it."

My tortillas come off finger-searing hot and dripping with the good stuff. They're all good. Even the strawberry. But, hands down, the winner's the corn with butter and salsa.

I stand with a whole lot of strangers. We're all chomping, oohing and aahing, trying to keep the drips off our shirts, looking up like guilty kids at each other as we lean over while the jostling sidewalk crowd tries to get around us.

Pile your plate as high as you want

This gal is an artist.

Her medium? The Mongolian Barbecue in Asia Wok here in Market Creek Plaza in Lincoln Park (324 Euclid Avenue, #405, 619-266-8881).

I'm watching Kimberly pile beef, pineapple, broccoli, green and red bell peppers, onions, mushrooms, lettuce, spinach leaves...a whole bunch of food from this buffet along with oodles of noodles.

She doesn't stop when it's just overflowing. She goes on piling

higher, higher...

"It's okay," she says. "It's whatever you can load in the bowl." She should know. She works here. This is her lunchtime.

Now she starts adding sauces and oils. Mongolian sauce, teriyaki sauce, garlic sauce, hot oil, ginger sauce, lemon sauce...

Finally she hands the teetering food mountain over to Jesús, the cook waiting on the other side of the buffet counter.

"No problem," he says. He throws the whole lot on the huge Mongolian hot plate.

A cloud of steam and smoke blasts off the surface.

This has to be one of the best eating deals west of the Rockies. Kimberly's paying \$6.49 for it. If she'd stuck to the veggies, she would have gotten it for \$4.99. Or less if she'd taken noodles, veggies, one meat direct from the chafing dishes.

"If you're really tight," she says, "you can get two egg rolls or a small serving of wonton soup for \$1.50."

I look up at the dome in this beautiful ceiling. Everyone in the international mural seems to approve.

Vinyl addiction. “Most people into vinyl have an addiction,” says Eric Howarth. He’s only half-joking. Howarth’s collection numbers in the neighborhood of 1000 records, and it’s been bigger. “I’ve been tearing it down over the past year. I got to a

when M Theory, a record shop he both founded and operated, was across the street in South Park. He sold M Theory, which has since relocated to Mission Hills, over three years ago. But Howarth’s not out of the record business en-

patio, the Atari lounge, the main room, and the stage.” The idea of a record swap in a nightclub isn’t entirely original. Rocket from the Crypt founder John Reis used to hold one at a venue he co-owns in North Park called Bar Pink. Josh Barnes promoted record swaps at the Shakedown while he was working there, and the Tower Bar was home to a record show as well. “The L.A. Record Truck — that’s a record store on wheels — he’s coming down, too. This isn’t just for serious collectors; it’s also for people who are just getting into collecting.”

Since divesting himself last year of Hi-Speed Soul, the record label he owned for six years, Howarth says he’s onto something different that he refuses to discuss. “I’m working on a couple of ideas, but I can’t really divulge anything yet.” In the meantime, Howarth plans to stage his Vinyl Junkies swaps bimonthly. “There’ll be deejays and drinks and food,” he says. “That’s a different angle.” The 21+ swap is either \$3 at the door or free with a canned-food donation. “I was really careful to make sure that all the vendors have great reputations,” he says. “There’s gonna be something there for everybody.” The August 3 swap at

the Casbah (a 21+ venue) is from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. — *Dave Good*

The flip side of vinyl. Mark Alan Hamilton was a Navy photographer who picked up DJing while working at a Hillcrest record store. The Cincinnati-native had ingratiated himself into the local EDM scene, playing shows in Ensenada, Tijuana, and Rosarito as well as various San Diego house parties and venues, such as Belo and the Red C Lounge.

In 2008, Hamilton decided to assume ownership of a downtown record store that he had no idea was tanking. “Fiesta Records specialized in house, disco...vinyl records on the electronic side.” He thought taking over a retail homebase on E Street between Ninth and Tenth avenues in the East Village was a good investment. “The owners of Fiesta Records were walking away. At the time, I was working as a bartender at Kava Lounge, so I borrowed \$600 from the cash register because I knew I could pay it back by Friday, and I also borrowed \$1000 from a friend.” Hamilton took over the lease at 909 E. Street, signing a three-year lease. But he couldn’t even keep the Fiesta Records name. “They had a \$700 outstanding phone bill. I had to change the name to FeeLit.”

But that was the least of his struggles. “Little did I know that there was a perfect storm out there working against

me — the bad economy and a technology shift.” The bad economy meant that Hamilton “couldn’t give away [the records].” The technology shift: “Every kid with a laptop had the technology to be a DJ. Every kid at San Diego State could bring 50 people to a show, so the older people, the real DJs, got shifted out of a job.” And, worse, Hamilton says he couldn’t buy the vinyl to stock his store. “All the distributors went away.” Yet, Hamilton kept FeeLit alive. “I diversified in order to survive. We carried local CDs and books and artwork on consignment.” Meanwhile, Hamilton, 39, knew he had to keep a job to keep the business alive.

market has turned around. “We have 8000 12-inch records. We have classical, country, Broadway, children’s, ’50s, ’60s, ’70s, ’80s...” Hamilton reports, “Vinyl unit sales have increased from one million in 2007 to 4.6 million in 2012 according to *Billboard.com*.” — *Ken Leighton*

Open your ears. “I do get complaints,” says KSDS assistant music director Chad Fox, who expanded the station’s night-time programming last year to focus on nontraditional jazz that might sound like noise to the uninitiated listener. Fox calls the nightly series *Progressive Nights*. “Recently, I played John Coltrane’s ‘Ascension’ [a

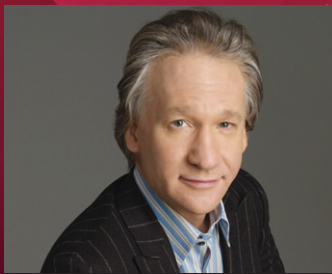

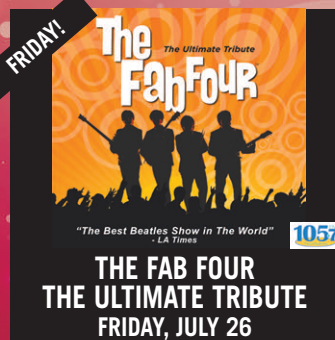

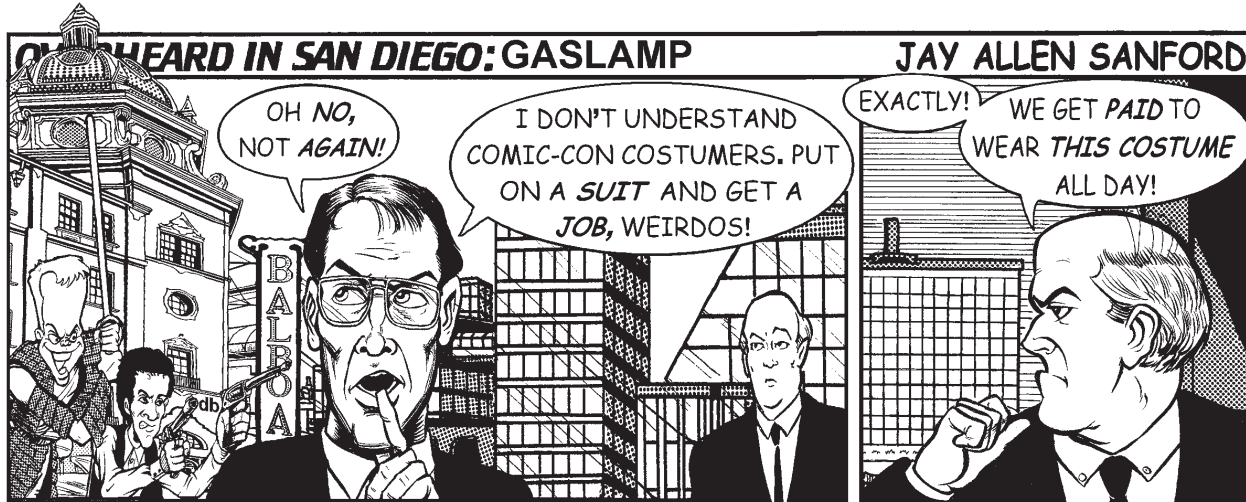

El Cajon kid

"It's only natural that El Cajon's official history should include Lester Bangs, Iron Butterfly, the Beat Farmers."

Grossmont College alum, essayist, moralist, boozier, music lover, self-described "drug punk," and legend — Lester Bangs (1948–1982), who grew up in El Cajon, is finally getting the documentary he deserves. Grossmont College's Raul Sandelin, director of *A Box Full of Rocks: The El Cajon Years of Lester Bangs*, took some questions over email. Check out the Kickstarter campaign to finish the film and head to Grossmont in October for the film's premiere.

HOW DID YOU FIRST LEARN ABOUT LESTER AND HIS ASSOCIATION WITH GROSSMONT?

As an El Cajon native and "rock 'n' roll kid," I first learned about Lester Bangs as a teenager in the late 1970s. But I didn't make all of the connections with Grossmont College, etc., until the last Lester Bangs revival, around 2000, when *Almost Famous* was released and the [Jim] Derogatis biography [of Lester] was published.

Also, Lester's friend Rob Houghton published an article in the *San Diego Reader* titled "My High School Days with Lester Bangs." That's

when I learned about Lester's actual connections to El Cajon.

MUSIC ANDREW HAMLIN

WHAT GAVE YOU THE IDEA TO START WORKING ON A LESTER BANGS DOCUMENTARY?

I'm an El Cajon cheerleader, of sorts. I'm always interested in some facet of El Cajon history. As the Boomers/Gen-Xers now become the caretakers of community and history, it's only natural that El Cajon's official history should include Lester Bangs, Iron Butterfly, the Beat Farmers.

So, I started the Lester Bangs Archive at Grossmont College (where I teach writing) in 2009. The film simply evolved out of the archive. There's been a buzz at Grossmont for several years, probably the result of *Almost Famous* and the Lester revival of 2000. Another instructor, Sydney Brown, started the Lester Bangs Memorial Reading at Grossmont. The premiere of *A Box Full of Rocks* coincides this year with the fifth-anniversary memorial reading.

WHICH FIGURES FROM LESTER'S EL CAJON YEARS AGREED TO PARTICIPATE?

Many key players in Lester's childhood: Milt Wyatt, Jerry Raney, Jack Butler, Gary Rachac, and Rob Houghton. These five guys, along with the late Roger Anderson, were Lester's closest friends in El Cajon. Their collective story is quite detailed and compelling. Also, Mike Stax of *Ugly Things* magazine and Grammy-nominated musician and journalist Jon Kanis give "objective" interviews. Both are fans but never knew Lester. However, both have "studied" Lester, including his El Cajon years, since they were teenagers.

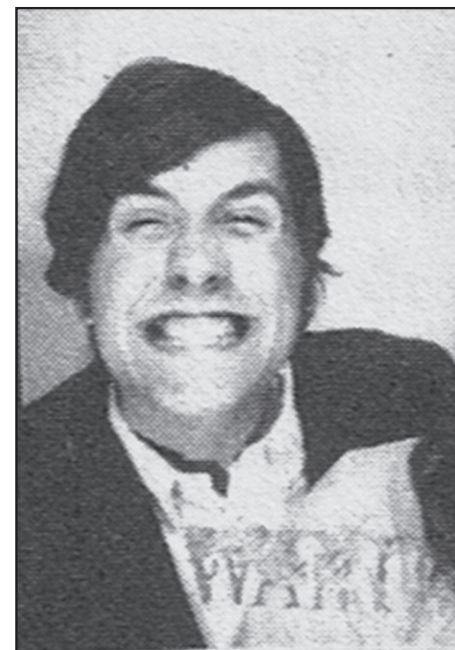
THE SURVIVING MEMBERS OF LESTER'S OLD GARAGE BAND CONTRIBUTED MUSIC TO THE FILM. HOW DID THAT COME ABOUT?

Lester sat in with a band called Thee Dark Ages in high school. He played harmonica on Yardbirds blues covers. After El Cajon's Iron Butterfly "made it," Thee Dark Ages became the top band in town. Thee Dark Ages' frontline consisted of Jack Butler and Jerry Raney. Later, Jack and Jerry united with Jack Pinney and Greg Willis (Butterfly's original rhythm section) to form Glory, which is basically seen as San Diego's top rock band in the early/mid-'70s.

In the '80s, Jack Butler formed Private Domain and penned Pato Banton's "Absolute Perfection." Jerry Raney went on to form the Beat Farmers, one of the pioneers of Cowpunk. Today, Jack, Jerry, Jack, and Greg still gig with their bands and occasionally jam with each other. So, it was very organic to get Jack Butler and Jerry Raney to get together as Thee Dark Ages. In the process, they even wrote six songs specifically for the film.

YOU'VE MENTIONED WORKING AGAINST THE "GREAT MAN" THEORY WHEN IT COMES TO LESTER AND HIS HOMETOWN.

These "great man" theorists see Lester as self-made and El Cajon actually was a hindrance. Those of us from El Cajon, especially those who knew him well, have a much more nuanced view of Lester's El Cajon years. And, we definitely see Lester as a product of El Cajon. If you like Lester,

you have to like El Cajon because...Lester is El Cajon. He's an El Cajon kid. He acts like one. He thinks like one.

WHAT REMAINS TO BE DONE TO FINISH THE FILM? WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS AFTER IT'S FINISHED?

The plan is to finish the film in September/October. We have to have it done by October 22. That's when we premiere it at the fifth-annual Lester Bangs Memorial Reading at Grossmont.

Since this film started as a student film and many people have volunteered to help propel the project, I don't feel right trying to market the film commercially or profit from it. Instead, I'm hoping the Kickstarter money will allow us to press around 500–1000 copies of the film, which will be given to donors, Lester's family/friends, music writers, media people, etc. Eventually, someone will probably pirate it and post it on YouTube.

And, my job will be done. Then, it can spread virally to who appreciates it. ■

Alejandro Rose-Garcia, from Austin, Texas, goes by the stage name Shakey Graves. If this makes him sound like an itinerant Delta bluesman, in the design of his performance, he is — partly. Graves is a one-man act, a guitar slinger/singer with a stomp box, but he's not a true bluesman by any stretch of the imagination. And NPR got it only partly right when they described him as an "anti-folk phenomenon," "anti-folk" being the name of a music scene in New York.
"I cut my teeth at the Sidewalk Café," Graves says by phone. "Anti-folk came out of there. They have this crazy open-mic where a couple hundred people show up, so they hold a

lottery to see who gets to play. I played with a lot of people that I consider legends, but I'm not sure anyone outside of there will ever hear them."
Otherwise, how best to describe the Shakey Graves experience? "I don't know," he says. "It's louder in person." And if not the anti-folk phenom, then what? "Probably just a musician."
This has been Graves's breakout year, which includes his first national tour in support of *Roll the Bones*. "I'm taking a show I've worked on for three years out on the road." After stints in L.A. and N.Y., Rose-Garcia, 26, says he went home to Austin to dial in the whole Shakey Graves thing at the local speakeasy level. The stage name also buys Rose-Garcia anonymity, and he says he likes that. He tells the story of how Jeff Buckley took off around the country at the peak of his fame and played venues under different aliases just for fun, more or less. "I get inspiration from

things that aren't personal," he says. "I'm not one to air my dirty laundry. I don't write breakup songs about old girlfriends. And I want it to be more about the music than about who's presenting it."

After three years, Vampire Weekend gives us *Modern Vampires of the City*. The chamber pop they introduced to us on their debut continues, but the band tones down the Paul Simon vibes they developed on *Contra*. After all, the third time is the charm.

a packed house, only then did I realize the power and majesty of this song. I caught on late, but the crowd on the dance floor, singing and bouncing along to the song, apparently did not.

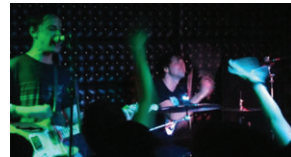

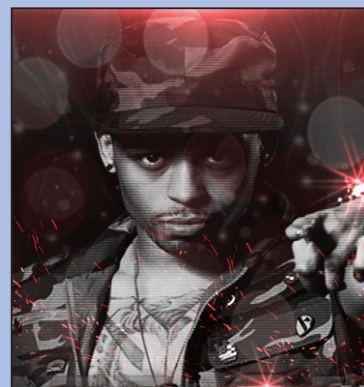

A few issues back, *Reader* eater Ed Bedford gave a firsthand account of Turf Supper Club's grill-it-yourself dinner arrangement. You order your flesh. You season and cook it. You get your dinner the way you want it. I won't rehash the menu here, but before we get on to the real meat of the story (the booze), here are a few tips to help you make the most of your experience.

First of all, it's important to understand that the Turf is no secret, nor is it spacious. The place is packed on weekends and often on weeknights. As such, some of the staff (though certainly not all) can come off as indifferent, even irritable. Maybe they are. Either way, your steak isn't going to be the only thing that's salty on a busy night at the Turf, so if you can't handle a little bit of 'tude with your food, you're better off dining elsewhere.

Next, know that you won't be seated at a booth if your whole party isn't present. I'm sure they have their reasons for this, and, yeah, it's

annoying, but now you know. Don't let it ruin your night.

Last, Lord help you if you try to sit in a booth and you aren't eating. For some reason, this is a huge deal. Avoid it.

On to the good news. The bar kicked off in the early '50s as a lounge frequented by bookies and horse-gamblers. Today, it's an undeniable social hub for Golden Hill's eclectic congregation of musicians, artists, students, and creative folk of every ilk. Turf remains true to their roots as a liquor-loving dive, and an after-work cocktail feels right at home in the bar's dim, retro interior.

Their prices aren't rock bottom, but neither are they as steep as most of the downtown locations at the bottom of the hill. On the upper end, there's the Esquire martini (\$10), made

with Beefeater or Ketel One, served up or on the rocks, and garnished with blue-cheese-stuffed olives. On the conservative side, there's the classic Manhattan at \$7. If suds are more your style, take 20-ounce pours of select local and imported beers for around \$6.

All told, the Turf is a great place to pass the night with friends, but only if you are willing to let the service slide.

INTERVIEW WITH *STORM SURFERS 3D* DIRECTOR OF PHOTOGRAPHY DEAN KROPP

Halfway through the screening of

Storm Surfers 3D, I scribbled “Interview DP?” on my notepad. This time, the directors or subjects wouldn’t do. It took some work, but I was fortunate to track down underwater cinematographer Dean Kropp, the man who — without getting my feet wet — placed me inside the barrel of a wave. I connected with Kropp early one morning while he was in Perth, working on another project.

Scott Marks: In your estimation, has there ever been a badly photographed surfing documentary? Don’t quality cinematography and photographing crashing waves generally go hand in hand?

Dean Kropp: I think it’s hard to make a bad surfing film because the subject is so beautiful. Crashing waves have sort of a mesmerizing effect to them. However, shooting a surfing film from the shore and being out there on a jet ski filming 30-foot waves coming at you — and then adding the difficulty of 3D — is something completely different. The beauty of our subject is what drew us to it, what convinced us

that this would be an amazing film. 3D is an optical illusion, that technological thing that will make your head spin when you get into it.

SM: Was this your first foray into the third dimension?

DK: We played around with it, but when it came to shooting a feature

film, the answer is yes.

SM: And this was actually shot in 3D as opposed to a stereoscopic conversion.

DK: Yes. We did not convert at all. We went out there to get it all natively in 3D. We believed strongly that if we captured the real event, people would

feel that in the cinema. There is a huge difference — [though] the untrained eye may not be able to tell whether it was a conversion or natively shot in 3D.

SM: Prior to *SS3D*, my go-to surfing films were *Riding Giants* and the Big Kahuna of them all, John Milius’s *Big Wednesday*. It’s doubtful that any

film in this genre will ever top Milius, but when it comes to sheer visual thrills, *SS3D* set a new standard. A two-part question: what, if any, surfing films did you watch prior to your work on *SS3D*, and how many, if any, 3D films did you consult?

DK: We of course watched *The Ultimate Wave Tahiti* because that came right before us. That gave us a benchmark. IMAX has this legendary status of being as good as it gets; the biggest film format, the biggest cameras, the most amazing lenses. The problem is that, once you go down that road with enormous cameras and enormous gear, you can't get as close as we did. We used that as our visual benchmark and we loved the things they did in 3D. But we wanted it to have more of a feature film feel to it, like *Big Wednesday*.

SM: There is a great debate among viewers and critics over the validity of 3D. How did you feel about stereoscopy going in and has it changed after making the movie?

DK: It's changed hugely. I went in thinking, *I know how this works*. And I do. I understand the science of why we see in stereo and how the optical illusion works. We talked to a lot of experts, and when we told them where we wanted to go, they told us, "It's not going to work," that it was too hard. They questioned why we would want to go to the trouble of [risking] too much water on the lens and this not working or that not working. All these things were thrown at us. But nothing beats going out there and testing it. We would spend our weekend putting different camera systems together, going surfing, going paddling. You take a bath in the process and then look on the screen and realize that it worked!

SM: What has the audience reaction been like?

DK: My 80-year-old auntie came to one of the first screenings we held. It was in a big, beautiful cinema near where I live. I even sat her in the right place — the "sweet spot" in the cinema. After it was over, she came up to me and said, "It was so exciting. It was amazing. I felt like I was really there." She hadn't told many people, but she used to surf back when women weren't allowed to surf. This took her back decades to her childhood.

PROFIT PROPHET?

Remember when Steven Spielberg said this: "There's going to be an implosion where three or four or maybe even half a dozen of these mega-budgeted movies are going to go crashing into the ground, and that's going to change the paradigm again." That was in June.

Since then, we've had *The Lone Ranger* (\$81 million on a \$215 million budget), *Pacific Rim* (\$68 million on a \$190 million budget), *Turbo* (\$31 million opening on a \$135 million budget), and *R.I.P.D.* (\$12 million opening on a \$130 million budget). Some of those films have been out longer than others, of course, and some have been helped mightily by the foreign box office for which they were ultimately designed (*Pacific Rim* has already pulled in \$110 million overseas). So, the doomsday prediction hasn't quite come to pass. Yet. But it's fun to read the signs.

20 Feet from Stardom — Darlene Love is the Jackie Robinson of session groups, a black backup singer who worked furiously to crack the majors by lending her formidable talent (and tonsils) to everyone from Bobby "Boris" Pickett to the Chairman of the Board. Forced to "ghost" for Phil Spector under whatever band name he decided to stick her with that week, Love eventually took to cleaning houses to keep afloat. Morgan Neville's *20 Feet From Stardom* introduces us to Love, Merry Clayton (the clarion voice crying "Rape! Murder!" on the Stones' "Gimme Shelter"), Tata Vega, Claudia Lennear, and many other unsung vocalists whose talent frequently outshines that of the headliners. It's rare when a feel-good "triumph of the human spirit" picture gets to me. But watching Ms. Love's climactic induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame left me wet-eyed. With Mick Jagger and a sorely-in-need-of-subtitles Bruce Springsteen. 2013. — S.M. ★★ (LANDMARK LA JOLLA VILLAGE; READING CARMEL MOUNTAIN)

After Earth — The single star is because the setup is fine — almost great, even. Estranged father and son (Will and Jaden Smith) survive a crash landing on a hostile planet. Dad's injured, and so it's the son who must retrieve an emergency beacon from a distant chunk of wreckage. Technology will keep them in contact, and allow Dad to see what son sees. Time is against them, along with everything else. The elder Smith assumes an affecting stoicism; he's a hero because he doesn't feel fear, but he doesn't appear to feel much else, either. So much for the good stuff. The rest is absurd emotional outbursts from the unready younger Smith, absurd anthropology (fear is not, in fact, a choice; the response to fear is a choice), absurd anthropomorphism (Mama bird!), absurd expositional visions, and *Signs*-style alien hijinks from director M. Night Shyamalan. A dimly shot, poorly scored misfire. 2013. — M.L. ★ (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

The Attack — Seated in a packed auditorium and just seconds away from receiving a prestigious award, a Palestinian doctor operating out of Tel Aviv takes a phone call from his wife. Upon returning home, he spies her purse and phone on the counter, thinks nothing of it, and heads to bed. Open on a pair of back-to-back lapses in logic and it's going to take an Electrolux to suck me back in. Turns out wife is a terrorist, and after hubby IDs her remains, he steps up to investigate the origins of her martyrdom. Did I mention that he's Muslim and she's Christian? Don't worry: writer-director Ziad Doueiri makes a point of it. Known more for the controversy it stirred — the Arab League called for a boycott — than its artistic aspirations, I would have been much happier if they did away with all of the obvious messaging and simply made a rousing genre picture titled *I Married a Suicide Bomber from the Middle East*. — S.M. ★ (LANDMARK HILLCREST)

Before Midnight — Late in the proceedings of this, the third installment of Richard Linklater's relationship gabfest, Jesse (Ethan Hawke) gets a mid-argument chance to make a list of his beloved Celine's (Julie Delpy) flaws. "Well, for starters, you're fucking crazy," he begins — and gets no further. But sometimes, a one-item list is enough. It's Celine's insanity — or at least, her panic over losing herself to the roles of supportive lover

and loving mother — that prevents *Before Midnight* from becoming a detailed, scenic, static portrait of midlife. Aging and raging, she’s the motor that makes this a movie. It’s been nine years since last we saw the couple; now, they’re finishing a summer vacation in Greece. Jesse has just sent his son back to his ex-wife in the States, and he (understandably) wants to be closer to the boy. But Celine has just been offered a job in France. Cue the verbal fireworks. 2013. — M.L. ★★ ★ (LANDMARK LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

Blackfish — Is director Gabriela Cowperthwaite’s documentary an indictment of SeaWorld’s use of killer whales as modern-day circus lions, despite the physical and psychic toll that captivity takes on the creatures? Or is it an indictment of SeaWorld’s apparent willingness to put its trainers in the water with animals it knows to be dangerous and even deadly? Or is it the story of Tilikum, a male orca raised in captivity, traumatized from his earliest days by his fellow prisoners, and valued chiefly for his breeding potential, who repeatedly lashes out in disastrous fashion? Or is it an investigation of our gradually improved understanding of killer whales, one that calls for a reassessment of how we treat them? All of the above. Now and then, the stories get in the way of one another, but SeaWorld doesn’t look good in any of them. Excellent, chilling footage, and some remarkable testimony. 2013. — M.L. ★ ★ (LANDMARK HILLCREST; LANDMARK LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

The Bling Ring — In 2008, a group of bored SoCal teens — some well-off, others

less so — started getting their kicks by breaking (actually, walking) into various minor celebrities’ homes and stealing their clothes, their shoes, their jewelry, and even their accessories. This is a filmed re-enactment of that. Director Sofia Coppola seems to believe that empty, boring lives require an empty, boring film. (The kids onscreen get cocaine pick-me-ups, the lucky so-and-sos.) The dull young things are pretty enough — though star Emma Watson never quite relaxes into character — and somewhere near the middle there is an arresting long shot of two thieves at work inside a glass house on a dark hillside. Other than that, it’s a slow trip to the inevitable, intercut with Facebook posts and singalong car rides. You’ll have to provide your own searing commentary on the semipermeable membrane of American fame. 2012. — M.L. ● (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

Broken — To quote Bambi’s BBF (best bunny friend) Thumper, “If you don’t have anything nice to say, then don’t say anything at all.” In the case of *Broken* (and out of respect for my friends at the Digital Gym), I think it wise to follow the anthropomorphic bunny’s lead. With Cillian Murphy, Tim Roth, Lily James, and directed by an ungallant goofus named Rufus Norris. 2012. — S.M. ● (DIGITAL GYM CINEMA)

The Conjuring — In the decades since Linda Blair first hocked up a pea-soup facial, Hollywood xerographers have found in demonic possession a perennial cash absorber. Director James Wan (*Saw*, *Insidious*) stylishly resists the easy temptation of schlock-shocks and CGI as a means of supplanting storytelling. For its first hour, this fact-based haunted-house chiller (Harrisville, not Amityville) effectively delivers the jolts. Vera Farmiga and Patrick Wilson star as a team of husband-and-wife exorcists — he’s the official demonologist of the

Catholic Church — brought in to repossess a remote farm that has placed its occupants — Lili Taylor, Ron Livingston, and their five daughters — under permanent house arrest. The trailer for *The Conjuring* is scarier than most horror features of recent vintage, and the feature makes good on the promise. Audience members at the screening I attended appeared to have been seated on pogo sticks. And clap hands for sound designer Joe Dzuban’s exquisite aurally-induced anxiety. 2013. — S.M. ★ ★ ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Crystal Fairy — *Easy Rider* for a decadent generation, *Crystal Fairy & the Magical Cactus* and 2012 is a smart but sour South American road movie that doesn’t know what to do with its drug-fueled revelations. Say this for star Michael Cera — he’s willing to play unlikable. Here, he’s Jamie, an ill-mannered narco-tourist on a pilgrimage to Chile to take San Pedro cactus on the beach. The character is masterfully conceived and written, but he also makes for lousy company, mostly because he values other people precisely insofar as they serve his ego and his aims. His fellow travelers are three extraordinarily tolerant locals and the titular Crystal Fairy (Gaby Hoffmann), a hippie-dippy American gal whose lustrous eyebrows are merely a hint of the rich landscapes to come. Ultimately, the film falls prey to Jamie’s narcissism, betraying a willingness to sacrifice its other, more interesting characters on the altar of his personal, chemically enhanced journey. 2013. — M.L. ★ (LANDMARK KEN)

Despicable Me 2 — Harmless fun, like a machine gun that shoots jelly. The plot is as innocuous as the most cookie-cutter sitcom — former bad guy Gru must go undercover to expose current bad guy, and must also deal with personal issues. (One of his daughters wants a mom, another falls in love.) The

animation is brightly colored and serviceable and full of exaggerated features: noses, wattles, bellies, stork legs, you name it. And while the humor can’t help but plunge into the potty, it does pull back on the one-liners, instead relying mostly on star Steve Carell’s not inconsiderable charm. Oh, and there are minions everywhere: yellow, capsular, spouting gibberish, and acting like indestructible six-year-olds on a sugar high. With Kristen Wiig as the voice of Lucy, Gru’s zany, gawky partner. 2013. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Drew: The Man Behind the Poster — Makes the case that the medium isn’t just the message, it’s the magic. Specifically, there’s a reason why a painting on a movie poster can do a better job of capturing the spell-casting power of cinema than a photograph can. At least when the painter is humble workaday genius Drew Struzan, the artist behind the posters for *Indiana Jones*, *Back the Future*, *The Thing*, *The Muppets*, and a bunch of *Star Wars*. It’s a bit draggy and a bit gushy, and the word “iconic” gets repeated to the point of embarrassment, but it’s also full of thoughtful commentary from the likes of Michael J. Fox, Guillermo del Toro, Steven Spielberg and Leonard Maltin. (Fox opens his comments by comparing a movie poster to the opening notes of a musical composition, and Maltin admits that when he thinks of Harrison Ford, he thinks of Cruzan’s image of him.) 2013. — M.L. ★ (READING GASLAMP)

Epic — As Pixar gets digested by Disney, Blue Sky Studios steps up and takes its shot at the title for innovative animated storytelling. (The CG animation itself is pretty innovative as well, particularly when it comes to water, sunlight, and facial expressions.) The biggest success is at the level of emotion: a teenage girl’s alienation from her crackpot father, a leaf-warrior’s grief over

the loss of his beloved queen, and even a slug’s hopeless pining for a pretty girl are handled with surprising deftness. But the story can’t match the characters: when your bad guy’s motivation is an arbitrary desire to upset the balance of nature, you’ve got a problem. The circle of life doesn’t really allow for the binary struggle between good and evil. Director Chris Wedge sought to turn author William Joyce’s source material from “a quaint story” into “a gigantic action-adventure movie,” and the stretch marks show. 2013. — M.L. ★ ★ (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

Un Flic — Jean-Pierre Melville’s acutely minimalist take on American gangster films resulted in a formal probity unlike anything cinema has experienced before or since. *Un Flic* is his final contemplation of the genre he embraced. Both the reason for the opening heist and the rationale behind a seemingly well-heeled cabaret owner (Richard Crenna) acting as criminal mastermind remain in the shadows as Melville wisely sidesteps the planning and opens on action. Alain Delon is the cop assigned to the case, a world-weary dick who shares two things with his target: career fatigue and a whore named Cathy (played by a ravishing Catherine Deneuve). The story unfolds in furtive glances and artful gestures, the camera moving only when it needs to follow the action. Dialogue is kept to a minimum. The final blast of action plays out in the name of love. Not between characters, but from the director to a genre he spent a lifetime refining. 1972. — S.M. ★ ★ ★ ★ (LANDMARK KEN)

Fruitvale Station — You know where this train is going before it leaves the station: the film opens with cell-phone footage of BART officers subduing a young black man who does not appear to require subduing. Then you hear a shot. The young black man was 22-year-old Oscar Grant, and *Fruitvale Station* is the story of his last day on Earth: December 31, 2008. Writer-director Ryan Coogler keeps the tone even, the pace steady, and the drama unfurled: he knows what he’s got is powerful, and he doesn’t need to overplay. Grant (played with great charisma by Michael B. Jordan) has a lot going for him: intelligence, good intentions, loving family, loving girlfriend, loving daughter. But he’s also unemployed, dishonest, hot-tempered, and a two-time loser who made some enemies in San Quentin. In short, a human being. But in the end, none of that mattered. With Octavia Spencer, Melonie Diaz. 2013. — M.L. ★ ★ ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Girl Most Likely — Kristen Wiig’s performance adds a new dimension to frazzled, but the closer the former skit-comedian inches toward big screen stardom, the more far-flung her choice of star vehicles becomes. Dumped by her boyfriend and unable to maintain a job writing descriptive blurbs for a New York magazine, Wiig feigns suicide and is ultimately placed in the custody of her estranged madcap of a mother (Annette Bening, in a role I wouldn’t wish on Jane Fonda). Back home in Atlantic City, she finds mom living with a zany boyfriend who swears he’s ex-CIA (Matt Dillon), her not-all-there younger brother (Christopher Fitzgerald), and who else but the man of her dreams (Darren Criss) currently occupying her old bedroom. This form of rapid fire, skin-deep buffoonery is about as close as contemporary cinema comes to screwball comedy — call it screwball sit-comedy. The fourth feature by Shari Springer Berman and Robert Pulcini, directors of the splendid *American Splendor*, maintains their reputation as one-hit wonders. 2013. — S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

And while director Shane Black brings a manic energy to the franchise that more than matches star Robert Downey Jr.'s twitchy performance, it's not enough to overcome the lumbering bloat. Black is aiming to leave you dazzled, satisfied, and maybe just a little wiser; you're more likely to leave punch-drunk, exhausted, and maybe just a little puzzled. Lots of stuff happens in the film's world, but all that matters is what's going on inside Tony Stark: an existential crisis following a near-death experience in *The Avengers*. Everything else exists to help him get his groove back. Hooray for narcissism. With Gwyneth Paltrow, Guy Pearce, Ben Kingsley, and Don Cheadle. 2013. — M.L. ★ (READING GASLAMP; ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

Man of Steel — Director Zack Snyder sucker-punches Richard Lester's *Superman II*, to date Hollywood's final say on how to film a comic book. Credit the man of steal and screenwriters David S. Goyer and Christopher Nolan with adding a couple of new wrinkles to the designedly faded red cape of Krypton's favorite son. Turns out it's not that easy being invincible; for once, we have a Superman whose greatest enemies are boredom and his own indestructibility. But in place of hanging a left down this avenue of pursuit, Snyder hit a brick wall by staging an endless (and paradoxical) third act battle to the death between CG immortals. As this year's Zod, Michael Shannon comes off looking uncomfortable beneath his Penn Jillette chin-bristles. With Snyder to guide him, Shannon pitches his performance at two levels: growl and grumble. With Amy Adams, Diane Lane, Kevin Costner, and Laurence Fishburne as the first black Perry White. 2013. — S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Monsters University — Everybody loves Mike and Sully, the scaresome monster team from *Monsters, Inc.* So maybe they'll be happy to see them again as college students in *Monsters University*. So happy that they won't mind the clichéd plot — lovable band of misfits in loser frat must rally to beat arrogant jerks in various feats of skill. And maybe they won't mind the shoehorning of Disney-style affirmation-speak: "I just wanted to be special." "Stop being a Sullivan, and be you!" (Neither makes sense: Mike doesn't want to be special, he wants to be scary. And Sullivan doesn't want to be something other than a Sullivan, he wants to live up to his illustrious name.) The story's finest moment comes in its final minutes, when it finally refuses to be completely, utterly conventional and expected. But even then, it never attains to inspired. Much Ado About Nothing — Director Joss Whedon invites a bunch of friends into his home for a weekend of Shakespearean partying, and films the proceedings in intriguingly muted black-and-white. The friends are actors, the house is designed by his wife Kai, and the goings-on involve a lot

of drinking and deception (lighthearted and otherwise) on the way to the altar. Almost more importantly, everyone seems to be having a grand time with the endeavor — hey kids, Shakespeare can be fun! (Plus, you know, brilliant.) Whedon is indulging himself, but he's not being simply self-indulgent; he aims to please us, too. It's the sort of successful microbudget experiment that makes you wish other directors would test it for repeatability. 2012. — M.L. ★★ (READING GASLAMP)

Only God Forgives — Did you find the violence in *Drive* just a trifle too restrained and tasteful? Then Nicholas Winding Refn and Ryan Gosling would like a second chance at your sensibilities. Gosling plays a drug-smuggler whose super-nasty mom (Kristin Scott-Thomas) wants him to hunt down the person who killed his brother. In Bangkok! (READING GASLAMP)

Pacific Rim — Director Guillermo Del Toro goes for the gold, offering up a robots-punch-monsters movie tailor-made for the international market: modeled after Japanese anime, set largely in Hong Kong, featuring Chinese, Russian, and Australian heroes operating giant robots named with a German word, and offering a Brit (Idris Elba) as its emotional core. There's a thrilling drama with a darkly satirical finish that serves as the film's prologue, but once that's out of the way, we slide into anime's more digestible mix of overheated emotions, baleful glares, and battle poses. Plus robots punching monsters. Del Toro clearly loves big, dumb monster movies, and he's served up a rustedly handsome example here, complete with on-the-nose dialogue, battles on land and sea and in the air, shattered cities, crying children, and a motormouth scientist with a crazy theory. Fun, but not much more than that. With Charlie Hunnam, Charlie Day, Rinko Kikuchi. 2013. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Pirates! Band of Misfits — Aardman Animations makes a solid case for its brand of gussied-up claymation (contra the grandeur of Pixar and the flash of Dreamworks) with this story of a foppish swashbuckler who just wants to be Pirate of the Year. You could spend a good chunk of your time just studying the magnificently detailed backgrounds. Unfortunately, the story is

scattered enough that you may be tempted to do just that. The humor runs both high and low: a fad-happy Jane Austen and a steampunk Queen Victoria. Plus Charles Darwin and his manpanzee butler. 2012. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

The Purge — Contrived shit doesn't get much nuttier. In the not-so distant future, a white, upper-class family plans on spending the Purge — a 'countrywide catharsis' where, for one 12-hour period every year, murder is decriminalized — in the safety of their steel-plated mansion. How do you go wrong with a foolproof premise such as this? Play it for limp peek-a-boo thrills, not razor-backed satire, that's how. Writer-director James Demonaco downed the screenplays for *The Hunger Games*, *Funny Games*, and *The Strangers*, and two minutes later purged a clothesline on which to hang this aggressively bulimic horror film. If cinematographer Jacques Jouffret's lens was any closer to the characters it would be behind them. You know something is wrong when for 85 minutes Tea Partiers hunt and bag Tea Partiers and still I'm not entertained! With Ethan Hawke, Lena Headey, and Max Burkholder. 2013. — S.M. ● (ULTRASTAR CHULA VISTA)

Red 2 — Amiable, empty-headed, tender-hearted geriaction flick about a retired agent (Bruce Willis) whose lady love (Mary-Louise Parker) and best buddy (John Malkovich) think he needs to get back in the game. (She thinks he's a little bit boring as a civilian; he thinks their lives are in danger. They're both right.) Just like *Iron Man 3*, *Red 2*'s larger drama is intended to illuminate the hero's romantic travails. Unlike *Iron Man 3*, it keeps a human face on the proceedings. Who needs mountains of CGI when you have Anthony Hopkins, Helen Mirren, David Thewlis, Catherine Zeta-Jones, *et. al.* hamming it up and mowing 'em down as our heroes dash about the globe? There is not a better deterrent to close with than this: written by Phil Hay and Matt Manfredi, the same somnambulists who lulled audiences into submission with their maundering adaptations of *Aeon Flux* and *Clash of the Titans*. Still Mine — Gorgeously shot story of Craig Morrison (a masterful James Cromwell), a New Brunswick old-timer who sets out to build a one-story house on his property for his wife Irene (Genevieve Bujold). He knows his business and he loves his wife, but the local planning department wants more than assurances of expertise, and his daughter thinks maybe she knows what's best. Think *Cocoon*, only this time with nothing you've dreamed of and everything you expect. A sympathetic grandson (Luis Omar O'Farrill) springs his gramps (Jacobo Morales) and two cronies (Diego de la Texera and Adrian Garcia), the latter providing overstated comic relief) from their iron-fisted Catholic old folks' home for one last weekend on the town. As the dyslexic Dadaist once said, herd me if you've stopped this one. What's

needed to set the proceedings careening in a tailspin of comic inventiveness? How about placing Mother Superior and her wacky security guard in hot pursuit? Rough going, even by Univision Puerto Rico's standards. 2012. — S.M. ● (DIGITAL GYM CINEMA)

The To Do List — There is something stupid-hot about the thought of a monotone, glassy-eyed chick whose frozen kisser prohibits her from cracking a smile while having indiscriminate sex with an array of partners. appeared to be targeted TCO (Transnational Criminal Organizations) assassinations. Turf battles between criminal groups resulted in some assassinations in areas of Tijuana and Mexicali frequented by U.S. citizens. Shooting incidents, in which innocent bystanders have been injured, have occurred during daylight hours."

In an interview published in *El Sol de Tijuana* on July 16, Mayor Bustamante, without saying who, said he had been advised before the alert was issued to not let it bother him.

"How can this not bother me, because it is not Tijuana's fault, it is the fault of the *deportaciones* of you who are cleaning out your prisons," the mayor said.

According to data provided by Tijuana's secretary of public safety, between January and June, 7000 people have been deported to Tijuana from U.S. prisons, *El Sol* reported. Many of the deportees end up being re-arrested in Tijuana for murder and drug-trafficking, while others are held for U.S. authorities on still-outstanding warrants in the U.S.

It's easy, said the mayor, for U.S. authori-

ties to blame Tijuana for a problem the U.S. let loose on the city.

We'll call it Gillespie Field "Aerotropolis" plan discussed...how 'bout a Chargers stadium?

The East County Economic Development Council's "strategic aerotropolis roadmap" for land surrounding Gillespie Field airport could include proposals for hotels and a facility for veterans to certify for civilian employment, development council president Jo Marie Diamond said in a July 15 interview.

"We want to create jobs" so people aren't getting in their cars and "going west to work," she said.

The plan for an economic hub around the airport won't include two uses proposed by Lakeside resident Robert Germann.

"There are so many empty buildings around Gillespie Field," said Germann in a July 12 interview. "I favor a Chargers stadium. It gets a little warm...we have a water park."

Germann, a retired truck driver, said he became concerned about airport issues in 2011 and joined the Advocates for Safe Airport Policies residents' group before forming Citizens Against Gillespie Field Existence Low Flying Aircraft six months ago. There

are about a dozen Lakeside residents in his group. Among the groups' concerns are that more flight schools will open.

Diamond said that the FAA requires aviation use on the land. Furthermore, the Gillespie Field Development Council (a group that advises the county) makes land-use rec-

ommendations for airport land.

Germann showed me a form that officials — in this case, the county — would submit to apply for nonaviation use of Gillespie Field. The government "gave 70 acres to San Diego County, so we can decide," he said.

The East County Economic Development Council in April announced that it received a \$50,000 grant from the San Diego Foundation Malin Burnham Center for Civic Engagement to develop the plan. Diamond said that the council expects to soon hear about a \$300,000 Caltrans aeronautics grant. She added that the South County Economic Development

Council is looking into the aerotropolis concept at Brown Field. Both councils applied for and would share a \$40,000 Federal Economic Development Administration grant.

Diamond said issues for both include what kinds of jobs they want to attract. At Gillespie, uses could include research and development, museums, and a transit center.

The council does not yet have a schedule for when public meetings on the aerotropolis will be held.

At some point during our interview, Germann looked east, envisioning a stadium hosting the Super Bowl.

"There could be a landing strip for private planes," he said and suggested a name for the stadium. "We could call it Gillespie Field."

Sara Osborn of the City of San Diego and Jami Williams of RRM Design Group, a redevelopment plan was adopted for San Ysidro in 1991 that does not address the current needs of the community.

The proposed plan would take the existing 5 million square feet of commercial development and increase it to 11.7 million square feet of future development.

In reaction to the presentation, a community member said, "This community has been underserved, and I get the feeling that we're supposed to now reduce our expectations and goals based on the assumption that the city will continue to underserve our streets and roads."

Rachel Kennedy from SANDAG displayed two architectural options for a new International Transportation Center at the San Ysidro trolley station. Both options include large parking lots, several bus lines, pedestrian-only sidewalks, and retail stores.

"Both of these options are fatally flawed," community member Miguel Aguirre said. "This, overall, does not uplift the community. It's really a big glorified trolley station. What we have now is buses, vehicles, and a trolley

all conflicting at the same level and they're still doing that in this plan....

"I feel the trolley needs to serve the community. It needs to be back at the gateway to really allow for any future development. This takes the best part of the property and puts a trolley on it, which is not the best use.

"If you're going to attract private investment, you need to give an opportunity to create a destination that is going to bring people to San Ysidro, to uplift not only the community but this location as a national gateway... There are a lot of things that are missing to make this a world-class project."

Got an extra \$3M?

Library seeking funds to start construction on new facility

The Friends of the San Carlos Library organization is linking the promotion of the branch's upcoming 40th anniversary celebration to increase awareness about plans for a new library.

The 9500-square-foot branch opened on January 9, 1974, and the updated plans for a 25,000-square-foot library and community center were unveiled July 10, 2007, by District 7 councilman Jim Madaffer and an architect from Dominy + Associates (now known as

domusstudio architecture).

"We're ready to move ahead," Friends president Judy Williams said at the July 10 San Carlos Area Council meeting. However, a cornerstone gift of at least \$3 million is needed to start the process. "We don't know anyone who has \$3 million; [tell us] if you do," she said.

The Friends' campaign extends to notifying elected officials and community donors about the need for a new library and the funds required to make it a reality.

"Keep in mind that it's not just fiction," said Williams. The \$3 million figure is a City of San Diego guideline of 25 percent of the cost, Williams said in a July 12 interview.

The two-story building designed by Lew Dominy's firm has an estimated price tag of

\$12.5 million, up from \$9 million in 2007. At that time, councilman Madaffer anticipated the project would be ready for bonding within 12 to 18 months, according to the Friends website.

"That was prior to the [economy's] crash," said Williams.

The land on the corner of Jackson and Golfcrest drives is currently an overflow parking lot. A sign displays a rendering of the new library, an image created before the update. The elements have obscured the picture. As a result, patrons like Eric D'Arcy wondered about the fate of the expansion.

"The billboard [is] old and crumbly," said D'Arcy. "It made me think [the plan] was going away."

Williams showed him the plans that place the 17,000-square-foot library on the upper level. Inside are separate rooms for children and teenagers. The 8000-square-foot lower level contains the 2600-square-foot community room. There's a stage and kitchen where Williams said cooking classes could be held.

Other amenities include an outdoor hearth and reading terraces, an area for the Friends of the Library, a seminar room, offices for public use, and a neighborhood police center. A parking lot will replace the current library building.

LEAD STORY

— Although Khalid Sheikh Mohammed (the alleged 9/11 mastermind) was waterboarded 183 times among several extreme interrogation techniques, he and his CIA captors eventually reached a moderated state. In 2003, though still housed in a “black site” in Romania, “KSM” asked permission to design a household vacuum cleaner, and the highest echelons of the agency cooperated, according to a former senior CIA analyst, speaking to the Associated Press in July. When a detainee exhausts his intelligence value, the agency’s main mission is to keep him “sane,” in case he is later put on trial, and the vacuum cleaner project was thought likely to engage KSM, who, 15 years before the September 11 murders, had earned a mechanical engineering degree from North Carolina A&T State University.

The Entrepreneurial Spirit

— The gourmet lollipop company Lollyphile announced its latest flavor in June: Breast Milk Lollipops (four for \$10). Owner Jason Darling said it “slowly dawned on” him that his friends were “producing milk so delicious it could turn a screaming, furious child into a docile, contented one. I knew I had to capture that flavor.”

— The Rocket Fizz Soda Pop and Candy Shop franchisers, already with a lineup of sometimes-unappreciated flavors such as buffalo chicken wing soda, briefly experimented in June with “ranch dressing” soda, a mistaken adventure that co-founder Rob Powells jokingly blamed on his business partner.

— Brewmaster John Maier of Rogue Ales in Newport, Ore., pointed out that “wild yeasts” have been used in beer for centuries and thus (according to a June report on *FoodBeast.com*) his company’s Beard Beer (from yeast of beards, including at one time, his own) should be regarded as a traditional brew.

Science on the Cutting Edge

— It was a special occasion in Surrey, England, in June as a rare plant prepared to bloom. The three-foot-tall *Puya chilensis*, native to Chile, features neon-bright greenish-yellow flowers with blooms large enough to yield drinkable nectar, but its most startling distinction is its ability to nourish itself by trapping small animals in its razor-sharp spines, leaving them to decay.

— During a June debate in a House Rules Committee hearing on abortion legislation, U.S. Rep. Michael Burgess of Texas, himself an obstetrician/gynecologist, criticized a proposal to out-

law abortion at the 20-week limit (where a fetus is said to begin to feel pain), insisting on an earlier ban, at 15 or 16 weeks. “Watch a sonogram of a 15-week-old baby,” said Burgess, “and they have movements that are purposeful.... If they’re a male baby, they may have their hand between their legs.” Thus, “If they feel pleasure, why is it so hard to think that they could feel pain?”

— In June, Barbour County, W.Va., firefighters, called to a farm in Belington, rescued the horse “Rowdy,” whose entire body was somehow trapped inside an industrial-sized tire. Rowdy’s owner said she believes Rowdy had an altercation with some of the other horses.

People Different From Us

— Melanie Typaldos, 57, and her husband, Richard Loveman, 54, in Buda, Texas, are supposedly part of a growing trend of people keeping pet capybaras (giant, semi-aquatic guinea pigs that are the world’s largest rodents, at more than 100 pounds). “Gary” sometimes lounges on

the couple’s bed and frolics in the above-ground pool the couple installed for him. Although Melanie and Richard keep other, more traditional, animals at their home (they told London’s *Daily Mail* in June), Gary is, of course, the only one as large as a human but with the distinctive body and head of a rat.

Least Competent People

— (1) Apprentice Brooklyn, N.Y., tree-trimmer David Fleischer, 21 (and son of the company owner), had to be rescued by firefighters in July after he apparently violated the cardinal rule in the business by cutting lower branches first — until he was stranded at the top of the tree. “He is a good boy,” said “Izzy” Fleischer, “but he is learning.” (2) Emergency crews in Fort Worth, Texas, responded to a Quik Trip gas station in June when an unidentified man got his finger caught in his car’s gas cap after he poured in some additive. Rescuers had to use a hammer and screwdriver to break the plastic around the cap and finally freed the man’s hand after 20-minutes.

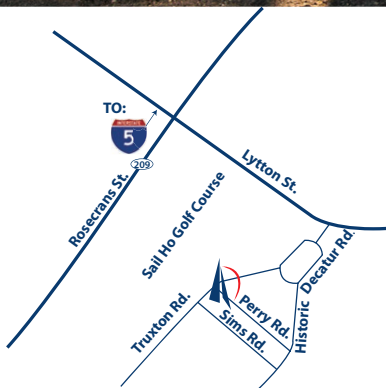
