Artist seeks billboard for lighthouse painting

Point Loma - A former San Diegan has a unique plan for commercial billboards: filling them with art, rather than advertisement.

Nathan Horner has launched a Kickstarter campaign seeking \$15,000. The money would cover \$2000 to create an enlarged print of a painting of the Old Point Loma Lighthouse done by Horner in 2001, another \$13,000 would rent a billboard near the intersection of the I-5 and I-8 freeways to showcase the painting for a month.



Old Point Loma Lighthouse may one day decorate a billboard, "rather than constant images to purchase and consume," says the artist, whose website will also be posted on the board.

"I have always felt that the visual space of billboards would be a great way to enrich a community with art, rather than constant images to purchase and consume," says Horner, who works at Imagic, a large-format printing company that produces artwork for billboards, and who he intends to commission to re-create his work.

Horner says he wants to "share the painting on the grandest scale, in the arena where it will be most appreciated. This seems like the perfect and appropriate time."

A portion of the billboard would also credit Horner as the artist and advertise his website.

"I originally only wanted the painting on the billboard, but there are no billboards the proper proportions and I did not want to crop or add to the original composition of the painting."

But too late to change your mind about Walmart

North Park — One is a large box store in Sherman Heights. The other is a Jack in the Box fast-food restaurant in North Park. Both have sent the City to court for allowing them to build outside the scope of their permits.

The similarities between the now-open Walmart and the nearly finished Jack in the Box in North Park are striking.

Earlier this month, on August 8, Judge Timothy Taylor ruled that the City looked the other way while retailer Walmart converted a Sherman Heights warehouse, once By Reader staff writers

a neighborhood farmer's market, into a 42,000-square-foot retail store.

Taylor found that the mega-retailer played down the size and scope of their building proposal.

"The Project contemplated by [Walmart] in 2011 was significantly different than anything that was "on the drawing board" in 2009.

In his formal ruling, Taylor wrote that shutting down the store or ordering some type of mitigation would be impractical. "[It] is simply too late to afford the petitioner the relief it seeks. The rebuilding is over and the supermarket is open...nothing would be gained [and potentially much lost] by ordering the City to set aside project approvals at this late date."

The ruling may cast a shadow as far as North Park, especially for those denizens fighting what they say is an illegal rebuild of a Jack in the Box fast-food restaurant.

Walmart's empty pledge to leave the exterior walls intact were also made by Jack in the Box on their application to renovate a drive-through restaurant near the intersection of Upas and 30th Street.

#### **Different kind of extraction**

Dental practice caught practicing fraud Encinitas — Former dentist Edward J. Bodek, 60, and his wife Mary Rose Bodek, 56, were sentenced to 365 days custody plus 5 years probation in San Diego's North County Superior Courthouse yesterday.

The Bodeks had a dental practice at 317 North El Camino Real in Encinitas, California, for more than 20 years. Mary Rose Bodek worked the front desk and was office manager; there were no other employees. The couple lived in nearby Carlsbad.



Former dentist Edward Bodek and his wife Mary Rose were found guilty of defrauding their elderly patients.

In their plea deals, signed June 25, 2013, each defendant admitted taking more than \$65,000; investigators claimed more than \$260,000 was fraudulently taken from victims.

The judge ordered \$74,412 in restitution to be paid by each defendant.

The Honorable Judge David Berry saved his strongest words for Mary Rose Bodek. *continued on page 38*

### South Bay's bond bombshell blows big time

n August 2006, Jesus Gandara was selected as Sweetwater Union High School district's new superintendent. According to

a grand jury witness, on his first day on the job, Gandara found time to go to a bayside restaurant and drink tea with two bond underwriters and a Sweetwater trustee. Three of the four men who sat down for tea — Jesus Gandara, former trustee Greg Sandoval, and bond underwriter Gary Cabello — are among the 15

who have been indicted in what the San Diego district attorney has called the largest public corruption case the DA's office has ever prosecuted. Gandara, Sandoval, and Cabello have pleaded not guilty.

More than a billion dollars in South Bay school bond construction money set these players in motion. In 2006, Sweetwater Union High School district passed Proposition O for \$644 million; in 2010 Southwestern College passed Proposition R for \$389 million.

The grand jury tran-




scripts offer the public a unique opportunity to look at the shenanigans involved in landing a piece of the underwriter action.

The fourth man who sat down for tea that morning, and the one who reported the meeting to the grand jury, is Jeffrey Kinsell, a principal in the bond finance company Kinsell, Newcomb, Dadios.

Kinsell was not indicted in the South Bay corruption case. However, in April partners in charge of Alta Vista. I would be a partner, my partners Dadios and Newcomb would be partners as well, but the five of us would start this firm and we would market our abilities in the finance world with the minority status."

Kinsell also told the jury that 55 percent of what his company does is "prospecting" for potential clients. Cabello, according to the transcripts, knew everyone in the South Bay, hence he

2013, in an unrelated case, the Securities and Exchange Commission charged Kinsell's finance company and the city of Victorville with defrauding investors on a municipal bond.

When Kinsell sat down for tea with Gandara, the \$644 million bond had not even been suggested to the voters. But to better jockey into position for more of the public dollars, Kinsell put a minority face on his company.

Kinsell explained to the grand jury that in 2006 or 2007 there was "a guy by the name of Gary Cabello and his partner, Luis Ruiz Dana, and they wanted a job. And I said let's not give you a job, let's start a new firm to take advantage of the minority status that we could sell, and make the two was the perfect prospector. Kinsell describes Cabello

as "like a Santa Claus. He was 5'8" and weighed 320 pounds. And always had difficulty handling money."

So Cabello and cohorts began to work the South Bay — donating to charities, buying tables at educational foundations, and even donating \$50,000 to Friends of Proposition O.

District attorney investigator Vince Giame told the grand jury that Cabello's 2006 expense report for Sweetwater prospecting totaled \$4446.43, for 2007 he spent \$3219.45. Two weeks before Sweetwater's board voted on the bond deal, Alta Vista spent \$1357.08 on a dinner for some Sweetwater decision-makers.

Along with entertaining, Cabello partially footed the

campaign bill for Sweetwater trustee Pearl Quiñones in her 2006 bid for National City mayor. Political consultant John Wainio told the grand jury that Cabello paid his public relations company to employ Quiñones's campaign manager Bob Castaneda.

After the bond passed, Alta Vista and Sweetwater's ex-superintendent Bruce Husson, who was a consultant to the bond campaign, hosted a Friends of Proposition O victory celebration in San Diego's exclusive University Club. The average voter, of course, was not invited.

Landing the proposition was one thing, but then how do you reel in the big one? How do you make sure your bond company is chosen and gets a hefty portion of the sale?

As the *U-T San Diego* reported June 14, Michelle Durgy, a finance officer for the county at that time, was part of the Sweetwater panel that interviewed the underwriters. Sweetwater's thenchief financial officer, Diane Russo, told Durgy that Alta Vista had to make the cut, had to be one of the underwriting companies that was chosen.

Ultimately, the panel picked three companies with the recommendation that

the smallest portion of the initial bond sale go to Alta Vista.

Another grand jury witness, Jason Richter, whose company was hired to give financial advice to Sweetwater, was summoned from Los Angeles to a very unusual meeting with ex-superintendent Jesus Gandara, extrustee Greg Sandoval, and trustee Pearl Quiñones.

Richter told the grand jury: "Frankly, it was a very bizarre meeting. It kind of started with the superintendent and Mr. Sandoval making statements that were *continued on page 38*

**Chargers and Weiners** There's good news for Chargers master of disaster **Mark Fabiani**, and though it doesn't come from San Diego, it does bear a distinctly familiar back story. Fabi ani's old friend and favored candidate

for mayor of New York is reported by the *New York Times* to have taken the lead. "**Bill de Blasio**, the most liberal of the leading candidates, has vaulted into first place among likely voters," the *Times* said last week. De Blasio's success is said to owe to

success is said to owe to a cause well known to San Diegans. Ex-Democratic congressman **Anthony** 

Weiner — who along with San Diego departing mayor **Bob Filner** has become a national poster boy for bad acting — was leading the pack until it emerged that he hadn't exactly lost the habit of sending sexually explicit photos to various women. A poll taken last week showed de Blasio first with 30 percent. Fifty-one percent of respondents pegged Weiner as the candidate they would "definitely not vote for under any circumstances."

Fabiani has been a long-time de Blasio backer. He had given the Democratic former Brooklyn city councilman and

New York Public Advocate \$3000 in mayoral campaign money through this summer. Coronado's **Mau**reen Steiner, long a donor to Democratic campaigns, gave **Christine Quinn**, the first female and openly

gay speaker of the New York city council, a total of \$1250. La Jolla lesbian and biotech PR mayen **Susan Atkins**, who sold her

firm to Porter Novelli in 2005 and has served as a San Diego city library commissioner, gave Quinn \$2524. Another San Diego gay leader, **Robert Gleason** — the Evans Hotel executive, a big financial backer of Democratic city councilman **Todd Gloria** who will wield major transition clout at city hall now that Filner has failed gave \$1000 to Quinn last year. Only one county resident appears to have offered Weiner financial succor. Rancho Santa Fe's **Stanley Cohen** came up with \$100 for the notorious tweeter on July 29.

### Thieves, scoundrels, and the RSF breakfast bunch Up in tony

Rancho Santa Fe, the county's preserve of genteel

wealth and privilege — along with a few occasional swindlers, suicide cults, and spies — takes the public interest seriously. A campaign committee called the Rancho Santa Fe Public Interest Committee recently filed its semi-annual financial disclosure statement with the county registrar of voters. The

group reports collecting \$7700 during the first half of this year, boosting its bank balance to \$26,501. Donors included hotelier Jack Giacomi (\$200); retired savings and loan mogul Kim Fletcher (\$100); and real estate developer Sandy Kahn, son of the late Irvin Kahn of mobbedup Teamsters pension fund fame

(\$200). But what does the committee do to advance the public interest with the money? Of \$4545 spent, \$3539 of it was for the "group's breakfasts" at the exclusive Rancho Santa Fe Golf Club. An additional \$343 went toward "holiday gifts to club servers. (Breakfast meetings.)"...It looks like icPurple, the self-styled "independent" super PAC that bankrolled TV spots for **Nathan Fletcher** after he forsook the Republican party when it didn't endorse his bid for mayor, is folding up shop. According to a termination statement filed by the committee, financed in large part by La Jolla computer mega-millionaire **Ted Waitt** —

and helped along by \$10,000 from garrulous genome-sequencing pioneer **Craig Venter** — the group ended life on July 25.

"The donations linked to a company that uses digital mapping to find illegal billboards are the latest example of a political tie-in to the mayor's billboard initiative, rolled out last fall with a no-bid contract to another Emanuel campaign donor," the paper reported. "The recent donations from three businessmen behind the tech startup CityScan came months *continued on page 38*

#### ENCINITAS

#### Went for the charbroiled flavor Golden Arches rise out the flames

Starting on Monday, August 19, lovers of Happy Meals were probably jumping up and down when they saw construction finally going on at the old McDonalds site near the corner of Encinitas Boulevard at El Camino Real.



City planners expedited the paperwork on the rebuild of this popular Encinitas eatery, but construction was delayed nearly 18 months.

The 40-year-old restaurant burned down on September 1, 2011, due to a gas leak in the kitchen. No one was hurt in the blast, even though five customers were still enjoying their meals at the time. The five employees working helped them get to safety.

The new McDonalds will be just a little bigger, about 500 square feet larger than the former building. The redesign and upgrades will include a modern façade, double drivethrough, and an outdoor patio. The old play structure that was inside will not be returning in the new design.

Due to the loss in the community of this popular McDonalds, city planners expedited planning approval. The remodel plans were submitted around February of last year, and approved two months later. Then why the construction delay of almost a year and a half? Parts of the center's buildings and land are owned by four separate investment entities. All four had to agree on the plan for the new building and its affect on other center businesses.

#### CARLSBAD Not quite teleporting App promises next best thing

The North County Transit District has rolled out a free new mobile ticketing app for smart phones. It appeared in the Google store in mid-July and iTunes Store in August.

After downloading the app, users must set up an account using an email address and password. It is then possible to store credit card information, bookmark favorite routes, and purchase tickets before you get to the station.

Once your tickets have been purchased, they are available in the My Tickets screen of the app. Before boarding the train, you must activate the ticket, which starts a timer and provides a barcode for the train employees to read with a hand held scanner.

A recent visit to the Carlsbad Village Coaster station showed a marked decrease in people waiting in line at the ticket machines. An informal survey found that nearly half of the passengers had pre-bought their tickets. If you buy tickets via the website, you will be mailed a PDF file with the barcodes for your tickets, which you may then save on your phone or print out on paper.

Coaster employees expressed positive opinions, although they did point out a few pro tips in order to speed the process. First, users should be sure to activate their tickets before the Code Enforcement Officers begin their check, so that the barcode is visible on the user's phone. Also, if you purchase more than one ticket, be sure that you activate them all — as they will each need to be scanned separately. Finally, don't panic if your activation times out. Just give it a few minutes to reset itself, and then activate it again. One Coaster rider who used the app said it has made riding the train much easier, since he can avoid the morning rush at the



machines. But he suggested that groups of four or more use the website to get a PDF of their tickets instead. Why? Since each barcode must be scanned separately, it's easier if they

than having to swipe your phone screen back and forth three times for each ticket. On a busy route, this saves everyone time.

ne of the most troubling aspects of "living in the fast lane" is that there is no exit. There is no slow-

ing down. The only way to stop is to crash. In the real world, I'd shake my head at any person who survived a wreck and then, the moment he was able to get behind the steering wheel again, revved right back to 90 mph. *Didn't he learn anything*? I'd wonder, assuming it's a guy because I believed that only men could be that reckless. At least that's what I thought until it happened to me.

My crash came in the form of severe illness brought about by stress. Despite having counseled friends on the necessity of maintaining life's tripod (self, friends/family, work) for personal health and stability, I recently found myself teetering on just the one leg — work. Having lopped off the other two, all it took was a small nudge, one particularly stressful day, to tip me over. After years of not suffering from so much as a sniffle, I found myself bedridden for days with fever and then bleeding out of one ear (an inner-ear infection caused my eardrum to rupture).

I continued to work while sick. People were demanding things of me, and deadlines had to be met. But all the while, in the back of my mind, old adages —

sentiments I used to preach — began percolating to the forefront of my mind. Such as, "Nobody ever says on their deathbed, I wish I'd spent more time at the office." I vowed to restore balance to my life, once I got

ance to my life, once I got better. But no one fools me more easily than me. The moment I got a clean bill of health, I was back to packing my calendar with back-to-back meetings and overlapping deadlines. My hearing was restored ("perfect" was the word the doctor used, but David insisted he should have said "nominal," mostly because my man hates it when I ask him to repeat himself, and now I had a professional's opinion to support my theory that David just speaks too quietly). Also, my blood pressure clocked in at 121/80, which, I learned, is "optimal."

Life's Tripod

"You know what this means," I said to David as we walked back to the car from the doctor's office. "I've adapted. My body's so used to stress it doesn't even raise my blood pressure any more." I meant it as a joke, but I wondered if there was a part of me that did in fact believe I wasn't stressed enough.

My ridiculous work schedule had led me to put off family and friends for months, but this past weekend, I finally accepted an invitation to dinner with a few close friends. I was looking forward to a little break on a Saturday evening, but in the back of my mind I was calculating the additional hours I'd have to make up for on Sunday.

In answer to the usual, "What have you been up to" query, I cringed a little when I heard myself say, "Work. Just work. I mean, it's fun and I love it, but... yeah, work." Because these were friends who share my love for travel, food, and wine, they of course asked where David and I had traveled recently, and where we were planning to go next. "I almost went to Martha's Vineyard for David's show," I said. "But I couldn't fly because of my ear."

"You need to be sure to take some time for yourself," said Ben.

Jessica agreed. "Totally — we're taking an 'emergency vacation' next week." When I started to explain how I didn't have time for a break, Jessica cut me off: "How many days were you incapacitated when you got sick? I'm telling you, take a break. Even a little one will save you a lot of grief. You need breaks, or else you'll burn out."

Jessica works in web design. She explained how, in a job that seems to run 24/7, it's up to her to set boundaries around her work to make sure she's tending to her own needs, and not just those of her clients.

"For so many years, I just did my own thing," I said. I went on to kvetch about how fatiguing it was to have to work with other people, especially those who don't keep the same hours as I do. In recent months, I've found myself responding to texts received after midnight (seriously, folks, unless you're in the hospital and I'm your emergency contact, put that shit in an email).

"I once worked with an ex-Marineturned executive who handled multibillion-dollar accounts," said Ben. "His phone was always blowing up, but he never seemed to get agitated by it. Once, when I asked him how he handled the pressure, he laughed and said, 'I've been shot at. This is nothing.' I always wondered if he doesn't get fazed because he was in the Marines, or if he was in the Marines because he doesn't get fazed."

"Yeah, it's not like I deliver babies," I said. "I've got deadlines, but that doesn't mean anyone's going to actually die. I think I might need to unplug for a few days. I just can't figure out when I can free up some down time."

"It's so easy to say, 'I'll just get this done and then I'll relax," said Ben. "But that never happens. It's a fallacy. The work never goes away. So you've got to schedule it to make sure you get your Barb-time."

The next morning, while still horizontal, I automatically reached for my phone. But then I paused while my arm was still hanging over the bed. Ben's words resonated in my head. I'd grown accustomed to starting work the moment I became conscious. Before pulling back the covers, I'd be checking my calendar and email and reporting to a groggy-eyed David all the things we had to deal with that day. Maybe, I mused, emails and texts could wait until I was actually vertical. Or — and this was a crazier notion — until *continued on page 44*





## Jack in the Basement

North Park residents propose alternate design for contested Jack in the Box remodel Proposed design would take drive-through traffic through underground structure, keep remodel "more in tune with neighborhood ethos."

CORNER OF URBAN AUTHENTICITY AND GENTRIFICATION, NORTH

PARK — "I'll admit it," says North Park resident/activist/ resident activist Kyle Buchanan, "there are times, usually late at night and after I've had a few too many artisan cocktails at Urban Solace, when I can't be bothered to fire up my Food Truck Tracker app and locate some wee-hours grub. I just want to own my inner corporate whore and get down on a burger and fries. If the corporation in question has a mildly amusing advertising sensibility, so much the better. So, yeah, Jack in the Box."

But, says Buchanan, "that proposed remodel on 30th is seriously uncool. Especially the drive through. Can you imagine what the sight of a line of cars, just idling and burning gas, would do to North Park's credibility as San Diego's hipster enclave? It'd be one thing if they had a bikes-only window, but it's a safe bet that's

not going to happen." Also a problem, says Buchanan: the prominent branding and goofy design sensibility that accompanies so many fastfood establishments. "Here in North Park, the people are their own brands. Just because they carry iPhones doesn't mean they're Appleseeds, and just because they eat at Jack in the Box doesn't mean they want to be seen strolling in under a 20-foot backlit logo."

In light of these concerns, Buchanan and some friends got blazed one night and came up with an alternative design plan for the restaurant, one that might satisfy all concerned. "They still get to keep their drive-through, and they get all the additional square footage they wanted. And we get to keep our neighborhood the way we like it. We call it Jack in the Basement. Above ground, it'll look like a one-story warehouse, the sort that might be hosting an impromptu poetry slam. No windows, no signage, just a single steel door for pedestrians and a ramp for cars. Walkers will eat on the ground floor. Drivers will head down like it's a parking garage, only they'll be picking up their food down there and then driving out the other side."

Buchanan admits that "we haven't heard back yet from Jack or the Mayor, but that's mostly because we haven't actually submitted the proposal. We figure that if they're ready for it, they'll come looking for us. We hope we can make this happen, so that when friends ask where we like to get fast food, we can still say, 'It's this really obscure burger joint; you have to know where it is."

#### HOPS OVER THE BORDER

#### by Chad Deal

f the idea of craft beer in Baja is new to you, you aren't alone. But now, more than ever, it's time to catch up. As any southbound San Diegan knows, the selection of suds in Tijuana and beyond has historically been limited to a less-than-dazzling assortment of what amounts to Mexican Coors and Budweisers, thanks to a duopoly dominated by foreign conglomerates Grupo Modelo and Cerveceria Cuauhtémoc Moctezuma, owned by Anheuser-Busch InBev (Belgium) and Heineken (Holland), respectively.

But all that is about to change. Last month, the Asociación de Cerveza Artesanal de Baja California hosted the Baja Beer Fest on Avenida Revolución, highlighting over 40 microbreweries in a two-day jubilee that touted a taste of the teas that will soon be available in south-ofthe-border stores, bars, and even — with any luck — on tap in San Diego's favorite hop holes.

The Great Baja Crap Beer Tapout of 2013 is all thanks to a recent ruling by the Federal **Commission for Fair Competition** (CFC) that has opened the swinging saloon doors to craft beer after decades of calculated pricing structures designed to repress anything but lousy — albeit refreshing —

Mexican beer. "Alcohol permits can be prohibitively expensive and are

owned by the duopoly breweries, then leased to the bar and liquorstore owners in order to protect their territory," says Fred Sanchez of Cervezas Artesanales Mexicanas (CeArMex), a Chula Vista-based organization that, among other things, is helping Baja breweries negotiate the bureaucratic jitterbug required to import their craft suds

to your neighborhood pub.

"The macros have contractual stipulations that specify that no other brands can be sold on their premises."

Another difficulty that craft brewers face, Sanchez notes, is that inordinately high taxes in Mexico

require microbrewers to jack up the cost of their wares by as much as 44 percent.

"It is an uphill battle, but the craft brewers are fighting bravely and continue to grow and produce phenomenal beer year after year. Things might seem bleak, but things are starting to slowly turn around."

A huge milestone for Baja brewers was reached on July 11, when the CFC decreed that the macros were to reduce their exclusivity contracts to 20 percent of total establishments over the next five years, leaving room for micros to market their craft.

"Municipal governments in Baja have taken it upon themselves to facilitate permits to the brewers and brewpubs in counties like Mexicali in order to fight the stronghold that the two macros have," Sanchez adds.

But what does all this mean for you and your neighborhood pub?



Cervecería Calafia's East Coast-style IPA was among the best

and his son Valter of Muñeca Prieta Brewing.

Mexicali-based Cucapá and Ensenada's Old Mission brews are already available in the states, and Sanchez says that plans are in the works to bring more Mexican micros to bars such as Hamilton's in South Park and Press Box Sports Lounge in Rancho San Diego. However, a number of obstacles still stand between San Diego bars and Baia brewers.

"There is a lot of interest in the Baja breweries, but some of the most popular ones have a very small production when compared to some of the U.S. up-and-comers... the investment capital isn't there yet. Another big factor is the high tariffs that they have to pay in order to import the basic materials

to produce beer."

Because of this, Baja has already become Mexico's de facto craft-beer barrel; yeast, hops, and barley can be picked up from San Diego suppliers and then driven south without being subjected to crippling import fees. But this is just the beginning.

"The tide is slowly turning in Mexico," says Sanchez, "thanks to the passion and quality of products that the craft brewers have."■

Guy broached the subject with Rich, never dreaming that Winnie would offer up the card shop as a home base. "Guy is the one who had the idea," says Rich. "He thought that home video might be the coming thing. Nobody really knew." Winnie gave the go-ahead to start the business, but as Rich remembers, there was one stipulation. "It had to be in this building, because she would not allow Guy to take me out of the store."

Winnie scoffs: "Guy thought that he and Rich would go up the coast. [But] we owned the building. It's air-conditioned. We've got registers and counters, everything is here. Let's try it here."

In 1983, a sign reading "Half-Off Sale" was taped to the front window of the Kensington Gift Shop. Collectors, seizing the opportunity, cleared the shelves of their Gorham crystal and Hummels. Empty videodisplay boxes replaced the pricey tchotchkes.

band, Willie Cisneros, had moved to Colorado in 1975, where the couple made it legal in 1977. Three children later, they were living in Denver when Kensington Video opened its doors. "My husband and I moved back here from Denver in 1988," Pam says, "and I became part of the team."

The Kensington Gift Shop measured approximately 3000 square feet. A temporary divider was built at the front of the store to separate the cards from the cassettes. If you look closely where the wall changes color, about ten paces from the entrance, you can see where the burgeoning video store was once separated from the dying gift shop. In 1990, Winnie convinced the owner of the adjacent property — at the time a refrigeration outlet — to sell. She

made an offer \$4000 shy of what the owner had in mind, but the two came to a meeting of the minds once Winnie agreed to

pay the difference.

But two storefronts were not enough for Winnie - today, Kensington Video, tomorrow, the

Ken Club! Winnie smiles as she recalls, "I always fought so much for parking in the back. The men next door picked on me. They loved to give me a hard time because Rich wasn't with me; he was working someplace else. There were only five spots out back, two of which were mine, and they were making my life miserable cash and were able to buy it."

What began with 250 tapes (200 VHS, 50 Beta) has since ballooned to a collection that boasts







The erosion of theatrical exhibition began in the late '70s, when the first wave of video-cassette recorders invaded America's homes. The Hanfords were riding the cusp of a boom. But at the time the family swapped trinkets for tapes, only ten percent of the population owned either a VCR or Betamax player. "Some people who didn't even have a VHS machine bought memberships," Guy laughs. "They felt sorry for us. They thought we'd lose our shirts, that we didn't have a clue."

The revival house of yesteryear became the video store of tomorrow. Every film geek in the land was their own living-room booker, programmer, and publicist. Instead of curtains, balcony seating, and a 70-foot screen to get lost in, movies were distributed to home theaters in rectangular black plastic coffins for licensed exhibition on 25-inch Sony Trinitrons. Art house or outhouse, it was up to viewer to decide what direction they wanted their living room to go in.

There was a time when one could purchase a 16-mm print of a feature for almost as much as it cost to buy a prerecorded video cassette. "You and I remember when videotapes were expensive," says Guy, as I nod in agreement. "Whatever people are paying nowadays is a bargain. They complain about having to pay \$20 for a DVD, but when home video started, most VHS tapes sold for \$75. *Platoon* was the first

one to hit the \$100 mark."

Although the list of rental titles continues to evolve, much of the store stands frozen in time. "Aside from looking over the 'new releases' shelf," says Guy, "you'd be hard pressed to tell what year it is by coming into the store." Kensington continues to charge a nominal fee for new members, something most rental outlets abandoned decades ago. The Proton television set pumping out an uninterrupted flow of Turner Classic Movies dates back to 1990. Rental slips are handwritten: you need a computer to produce computer printouts. Video was a Vegas showroom, Winnie would be the headline attraction. Who would have thought this saintly, white-haired grandmother — who gives Mrs. Santa Claus a run for the money in the adorable department — speaks fluent Charles Bronson?

One of the more frustrating aspects of this business is the unavailability of a number of films that have never made it to DVD. "Don't throw away your VHS machine," Guy jokes. "We have somewhere around 5000 videos that have never been put on DVD."

How is it that the proprietor of a top-flight video store, a woman who has every Charles Bronson picture committed to memory, has never set aside the time to watch such teeth-cutting classics as *Gone With the Wind, The Wizard of Oz*, or *Citizen Kane*? This is the only time during our conversation that the otherwise boisterous Win-

nie lowers her voice. "I shouldn't have told you that," she says. But the remorseful tone doesn't last long. "This is a business, Scott," Winnie says, as if that particular nugget of information had somehow leaked from my memory and run out my ear. "I'm a promoter, and you know that. Certain films sell themselves and don't need my help. That's the main reason I've never watched them."

several advantages over Netflix. "People don't know what they want to watch today, let alone three days from now. Some people still like to browse the stacks and hold the boxes in their hands." Guy laughs off a mention of Red Box. Though their rental fee is one-third of what Kensington Video charges, Red Box will never pose a threat. Generally slow to embrace new formats, Kensington's "customer base is also slow to react," Guy says. The store doesn't stock digital copies of every film that's made the jump from VHS to DVD, or DVD to Bluray. A large percentage of their customer base does not own a Blu-ray player. ("We love the Bluray combo packs," Guy is quick to add.)

"You have to be selective," he says. "There are a lot of dogs out there. You have to know the film's history, and whether you can recall anybody asking for it or renting it. Are we going to shell out \$15 for every replacement video? No. You have to know your customer base and the right call to make." And don't expect to find a 3D copy of *Hugo* beaming from a point-ofpurchase display. "If we were to bring in 3D, we'd be lucky if we rented one a week. The demand just isn't there."

It's not all about the video rentals. The Hanfords are also a community-minded lot eager to offer their services to neighborhood organizations. Pam is on the board of the Adams Avenue Business Association,

while her brother holds a similar position on the board of the Kensington-Talmadge Planning Group.

There's a different world going on inside the doors of Kensington Video, one worth visiting. Just don't get too chummy with the counter staff.

#### \* \* \* Reflections on Kensington:

Rich: "Kensington has transitioned to a little village atmosphere. It changed. The sidewalks used to roll up in this town at 8:00 p.m. Today the area is vibrant until 10:00 or 11:00. The Ken Club used to be the only place to get a social drink, and now we've got probably 12 to 15 places. The neighborhood is starting to become a restaurant row. Parking is always going to be a premium."



## When the **music's** over

**C** hey shut down the music program here in 2000." Emily Gray is Crawford High School's new music teacher. She was hired to restart the music program. "At the beginning of the year, we had no instruments. So I taught the students about music theory. I taught them how to read notes. Then, when some money was freed up, we got recorders [those little plastic whistle-like things]. At one point, I had 70 recorders all at one time in class. I thought my ears were gonna explode."

In the band room, there are a dozen music stands of every description and a few chairs arranged in a semicircle. The instrument lockers hang open and empty. The classroom looks as if it's been pilfered, and in a way, it was. "The instruments went away to La Jolla High School in 2000," says Gray.

Crawford can only afford to pay Gray for 67 percent of her time. (The remaining 33 percent of her work week is spent teaching music at Lincoln High School.) Gray says her beginning band class is restricted to sharing those recorders, but the 16 students enrolled in intermediate band class have the use of whatever

conventional instruments she's been able to cobble together via donations.

"Two flutes, three clarinets, three alto saxes, two tenor saxes, three trumpets, some percussion, and a trombone." The trombone is made from PVC, the same material used for irrigation pipes. Plastic, not brass. "They only cost 150 bucks,"

Gray says, "and they sound great."

In March, the San Diego Unified School District, of which Crawford is a part, received a Best Communities in Music Education Award; as such, it was named one of the best places in the country to get a music education. Other school districts across the country — 306 of them — likewise received a Best Communities in Music Education Award, bestowed by the National Association of Music Merchants in Carlsbad. The winners were selected from a pool of over 2000 applicants.

The award was established in 1999 to recognize schools for keeping music alive in their curriculums. Winners are culled from surveys designed to measure things like fundraising, instruction time, and facilities. School districts reaching the 80th percentile and above are deemed winners.

According to the association, areas in which the San Diego Unified School District especially stood out included budgetary commitment to music, opportunities to learn music, the presence of certificated music teachers, adherence to state and national standards, types of musical experiences offered, and opportunities for performance and competition.

Not everybody involved in the business of music education in San Diego agrees.

"When we heard about the award, we said,





'How could this happen?"" Mitchell Way is director of instrumental music at Helix High School in La Mesa, in the neighboring Grossmont Union High School District. "I get frustrated when I hear stuff like this. The days of having to do music as an elective? They're over. San Diego may have a good elementary school music program, but most students don't have anywhere to go after that."

Michael Benge is associate music director at Helix. "What standard are they using for comparison? When you look at some of the great programs in the Midwest or back east, we don't even come close. Maybe Poway or North County does, but not San Diego. Did they [SDUSD] get that award just because they exist?"

Mitchell Way:



Emily Grav was hired to restart the music program at Crawford High School.

"There's only one great [school music] program in San Diego, and that's Mira Mesa." Why? Mira Mesa, he explains, has a couple of full-time instructors and offers a variety of music classes.

Benge thinks the Music Merchants award may foster a potentially damaging illusion: "If people think San Diego is one of the best places in the nation for music education, then that tells everybody that we must be getting enough funding. And that's not true."

"Next year, we'll have music in every single school except Kearny." Karen Childress-Evans is director of visual and performing arts for the San Diego Unified School District. Why not Kearny? "Because there's no money for a teacher," she says. "[My budget] is cut all the time. I'm just below bare bones. They talk about bare bones, but they've amputated legs here."

Emily Gray: "Last year we had a budget of about \$2000 from the school administration and various monetary donations from alumni and other donors. For the coming two years I was given about \$5000 to spend on supplies."

The Helix High School music program survives on fundraising efforts and donations. "We can only spend what we bring in," says Helix Instrumental Music Association President Mike Reed. He says they collected \$83,000 last year and spent \$86,000. "We have a tiny cash reserve."

Childress-Evans explains that school music budgets traditionally come from several sources: ASB fundraisers, unrestricted funding that each [campus] receives from the district, grants, and donations. "Most budgets depend on donations these days, since the district is just beginning to recover from the California educational-budget crises. Every school is different. For instance, Hoover High School receives significant funding from Price Charities, while Mira Mesa High School does a lot of fundraising. Each school's prin-

cipal is the one who determines how much money will be spent on all arts programs."

Still, Childress-Evans is good with the recognition. "It's not that we have all the answers and that we rock. It's that we've been able to do things other districts can't do. We are the second-largest district in California, and that looks

a lot different than districts with only two elementary schools."

She also points out that hundreds of those same NAMM awards are given each year, but that the San Diego Unified School District was the sole recipient of the Kennedy Center for the Arts and the National School Board Association Award for Arts Education in 2011. "What they said to me was this: they had no idea how we did so much with so little."

Would Emily Gray agree that San Diego's music programs are all over the board? "Yes." But she says there are programs in worse condition than Crawford's. "And Mira Mesa," which she agrees has the best program, "started off the same way. In the beginning they had nothing." Gray, 24, is a Mira Mesa gradu-



largely innuendo about too many cooks in the kitchen, and this was regarding the number of underwriters.... For periods of time they would speak together in Spanish, which I don't speak...."

The upshot of this "bizarre" meeting was that one of the large underwriting companies was dropped, and the percentage that Alta Vista received was upped to 40-to-50 percent according to Richter's testimony.

Alta Vista also wined, dined, and took administrators and employees from Southwestern College on lavish golf excursions. At Southwestern, as well, Alta Vista won a portion of the bond sale. Later, when Cabello went to work for another underwriting company, Cabrera Capital, he was able to take Sweetwater and Southwestern's business with him.

In May of 2012, California Watch reported that "in the past five years in Califor-

nia, five major underwriters donated \$1.8 million to help pass 111 ballot measures authorizing \$15.5 billion in debt.... Overwhelmingly, bond underwriters who donate to these campaigns were granted contracts by school districts."

State legislation is being considered that would regulate this relationship, though school districts are lobbying heavily against it.

Trials for the 15 South County trustees, administrators, and vendor /contractors indicted by the grand jury begin in February 2014.

after Emanuel officials added the firm to a shortlist of companies qualified to seek city contracts under the mayor's municipal marketing program.

"The men's connections to CityScan — formerly known as Government Enhancement Services — are not apparent in the campaign disclosure reports filed with the state by Emanuel's political operation; all three have broader business interests and are listed in the disclosures by their associations to other companies." After the Tribune got onto the story, Emanuel's office said the mayor was refunding the campaign cash. According to last week's disclosure filing with the San Diego city clerk's office by the firm's contract lobbyist, El Cajon's Policy Development Group, CityScan seeks to provide "Lidar technology to conduct sidewalk assessments." No contributions to San Diego politicos are listed. - Matt Potter

"I want Mrs. Bodek to understand that her claims of caring for other elderly people fell completely false to me, given who you were stealing from and the destruction that you caused out there, and letting people go to their death knowing that their finances had been ruined and they left nothing for their children," Judge Berry said.

A prosecutor asserted that the Bodeks rented 30 different storage units, and these were full of women's clothing from stores such as Saks Fifth Avenue and Nordstrom and Neiman Marcus. The storage units were filled with high-end items such as costly handbags and fur coats; many items appeared un-worn and still had price tags attached, it was alleged. "Some of the clothes appeared to have



#### Little or no evidence

**District Court investigates** local police practices La Mesa — Detectives from the La Mesa Police Department are accused of searching the DMV database and collecting driver's license photos of African-American males as a way to locate suspects. A lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court on Monday alleges that detectives falsely arrested a man for committing two robberies with little or no evidence other than his driver's license photograph matched the suspect's description.

La Mesa resident, Robert Titus Jr., was arrested for the robberies of two Albertson's grocery stores in 2011.

In the first incident, employees spotted an African-American man leaving the store carrying two bottles of wine. Two months later, employees at a different store saw what detectives believed was the same man stealing a package of hamburger buns and a bottle CITY LIGHTS

of vodka. On each occasion the suspect was wearing red, leading detectives to believe that the robberies were gang-related.

According to the complaint, detectives scoured through the DMV database to locate a suspect.

"It was the custom, practice, and policy of the La Mesa Police Department to obtain photographs of black males living in the La Mesa area and make them suspects in criminal investigations even though they are not gang members or suspected of any criminal activity," states the complaint.

The complaint goes on to say that Titus Jr. was not a member of any local gang and has a congenital heart condition that "makes the consumption of alcohol a potentially fatal activity."

#### "You shot me!"

Girlfriend and unborn son die Escondido — A prosecutor claims that the 21-yearold boyfriend of a pregnant teen pressed the tip of his 9mm Glock semi-automatic against her belly, just above her belly button, and then pulled the trigger.

The bullet did not touch the 16-month-old male

fetus, but the baby died when the mother died, according to prosecutor Keith Watanabe.

Other persons who were in the Escondido, California apartment at the time of the shooting rushed to the room after they heard the shot. Witnesses said they heard the startled young woman exclaim "You shot me!" Eighteen-year-old Viridiana Rodriguez was standing, facing her boyfriend Ruben Anthony Cepeda, when he apologized and told the pregnant teen "it was an accident," according to witnesses.

Around the timeframe of the shooting, the defendant had been in contact with several former girlfriends, including one 19-year-old woman named Carina who is the mother of his 2-year-old child, prosecutor Watanabe told the jury.

Ruben Cepeda fled the apartment after the shooting. He traveled from Escondido, California to the Mexican border at Otay Mesa, tracked by cell phone usage, the prosecutor said.

Prosecutor Keith Watanabe has charged Ruben Anthony Cepeda, now 22, with two murders for the deaths of 18-year-old Viridiana Rodriguez and her

#### **Little Darlings not** so darling

Undercover at a strip club Lemon Grove - Sheriff's deputies conducted a raid at Little Darlings Gentlemen's Club in Lemon Grove on August 22, which resulted in the arrest of three employees.

Local residents have long complained of prostitution, illegal drug use and sales occurring on the property. Over an eight-month period, detectives from the Narcotics Task Force conducted 12 undercover operations. On 8 of those occasions, dancers or other club employees sold narcotics to the undercover agents, who also "witnessed or were solicited for lewd and lascivious acts for money." Detectives were also sold alcohol during their visits, despite the club not being licensed to sell alcoholic beverages.

Last night a search warrant and four arrest warrants were served at the club shortly before 11 p.m. During a search, deputies seized an undisclosed amount of narcotics, some of which were packaged for sale. One employee was arrested for drug possession, another for possession with intent to sell. and a third on an outstanding warrant.

The investigation is still underway, and the Sheriff's Department says more arrests are likely forthcoming.

Even those whom Jacobs and the company haven't supported in the past are looking for future money from the La Jolla billionaire and his friends, the sources say, Jacobs has been an Ohama backer.

#### No bagels for blue boy Motorcycle cop vows revenge

Local bagel shop owner Steve Amster is pissed again. His July 2012 run-in with a sheriff's motorcycle officer — when he asked the officer to leave his bagel shop's parking lot — may have caught up with him.

Amster says at the time of the 2012 incident, the officer said, "I'll get you down the

road." On August 14 at 6:10 a.m., Amster says deputy Tim Petrachek did just that.

While Amster was pulling out of the 76 station across the street from his bagel shop on El Camino Real, he saw the longtime motorcycle officer pass by, turning left onto El Camino Real. Officer Petrachek was waiting in Amster's parking lot off El Camino Real when Amster pulled in.

The officer wrote Amster two "fix-it" violations for a nonvisible license plate and modified front turn signals on Amster's Honda motorcycle.

"This is clear harassment," says Amster. "He is a terrorist to the community, just making revenue for the city."

Sgt. Tony O'Boyle, Officer Petrachek's superior, believes that someone with an attitude, like perhaps what Amster's may have been the morning of the incident, probably led to him not walking away with just a warning. Amster plans to take the case to trial.

Disclosure: I first met Officer Petrachek "formally" in 1999 while speeding 62 mph in a 45 mph zone along Coast Highway 101. Unbeknownst to me, Petrachek wrote the ticket "soft" — violating the Basic Speed Law (never drive faster than safe) — versus 17 mph over the speed limit. The difference saved me about \$100 in court fines and fees.

#### Mother hen becomes an outlaw

#### Pampered "children" must go

Maricela Martinez has kept her happy chickens in her yard in Golden Hill for seven years. Signs on the fence, now taken down, proclaimed "Happy Chickens" and eggs for sale and showed pictures of the hens. A hand-lettered sign, in both Spanish and English, invites visitors to "pull the cord to ring the bell." Kids on field trips from Einstein Academy, a few blocks away, come to peer at the chickens.

During the day the hens are allowed to range freely around the small urban plot

the Martinez family calls home. And they get to eat fresh fruit, which Maricela's son José demonstrates by picking a peach from a tree in the front yard and holding it out for the brood. To our amazement, the hens gather around and take turns pecking at the ripe peach, making charming little clucks. For the most part, the hens are tranquil and quiet, following us around curiously and pecking gently at our ankles while we munch on peaches.

Casting a pall of sadness over the happy chickens is the fact that the city has informed Maricela that she must get rid of most of her hens and all of her roosters. Her eyes get misty as she tells us she must sell the chickens, whom she considers her children. When she picks up her hens to show us their unique features, the birds relax in her arms, soothed by her mothering.

In 2012, the City of San Diego amended its municipal code to accommodate the community's growing interest in raising chickens within city limits. Previously, residents could have up to 25 chickens only if the coop was 50 feet away from any residential buildings. But on the Martinez property, there isn't a place outside that is 50 feet away from any of the edges of the lot, and she's got more than 25 chickens.

Slovenia's picturesque Lake Bled, complete with medieval church-topped island

#### **Five reasons to visit** Slovenia **By Dominic Carrillo**

Preface: I do not usually gush about entire countries. I do not work for the Slovenian office of tourism.

(1) Ljubljana (pronounced "lubeee-ana") is a beautiful city with a central old town and a river running through it — reminds me of a mini Prague or Budapest. Bars and cafés line the river, and little bridges connect this ideal pedestrian-only area. A castle is perched above the old town that has a panoramic view of the city, revealing a lot to explore in a relatively small space.

Read before you go

(2) Lakes. Lake Bled is the more touristy body of water because of its picturesque, church-topped island and castle that overlooks the lake from a rocky cliff. I caught myself staring at the castle and saving "awesome" enough times to sound like an authentically dumb Californian to any passerby.

(3) Hikes. We hiked as far as we could up Vintgar Gorge, which is only four kilometers from Lake Bled. The hiking path lines a spectacular emerald green river. It was such a wonderful place that I actually felt guilty when I had to pee off the side of the wooden walking path. (Nobody was around.)

We went on another great hike up to Savica Waterfall near Lake Bohinj. Though the snowpack was so high it was impossible to get close to the falls, it was well worth the icy, 30-minute hike up to the lookout point.

(5) Caves. We drove to Postojna Cave at 5 p.m. and couldn't get in because it closed to the public at 4. I'm always late. Story of my life. So I'll have to save this cave and Krizna cave — and the Venetian town of Piran on the coast — for the next time I'm driving through this little country.

San Diego Outdoors with the Museum Canyoneers

#### **MT. WOODSON VIA THE BLUE SKY RESERVE**

Stroll through one of San Diego's more scenic oak woodlands and experience a diversity of vegetation types on your way up to the top of Mt. Woodson where rock climbers may be seen.

Distance from downtown San Diego: 27 miles. Allow 35 minutes driving time. From I-15 take the Rancho Bernardo Road exit and turn right to continue on Espola Road for approximately 3 miles. Make a left into Blue Sky Ecological Reserve parking lot, which is open sunrise to sunset except for summer when open at 6:30 a.m. Vault toilets but no water available. Hiking length: 11 miles out and back. Difficulty: Moderately strenuous because of the length and elevation increase/decrease of 2200 feet. Maximum elevation is 2894 feet. Carry water. Dogs are allowed but not bicycles or motorized vehicles.





Woodson is one of San Diego's favorite places for a day hike. Many people make the climb on the asphalt-payed road on the east side of the moun-

tain off SR 67 that rises steeply to the top. Other hikers take the somewhat longer but more scenic west side trail that starts from Lake Poway. A less traveled option,

presented here, is to start your ascent at the Blue Sky Reserve, adding a few more miles but giving you a chance to stroll through one of San Diego's more scenic

oak woodlands while experiencing a diversity of vegetation types on your way up. The Blue Sky Reserve, jointly managed by the California Department of Fish & Game and the City of Poway, directly connects to Poway's extensive network of hiking trails.

This is a moderate to strenuous 11-mile round-trip hike on well-marked and maintained trails. Start hiking on the Blue Sky Reserve Trail, at the south end of the parking lot. Although this trail continues 2.4 miles to the Ramona Dam, turn south (right) 0.9 mile from the trailhead onto the Lake Poway Recreational Area trail. Much of both of these trails pass through a beautiful coast live oak forest and near a lush riparian community with mature western sycamores, black willows, and mule fat, as well as oaks. In another 0.25 mile is the Poway

Wilderness Picnic Area with nicnic tables, water, and toilet facilities. From there, the trail switchbacks up a coastal sage scrub-covered hillside to take you over the east side of the Lake Poway Dam and into the recreation area.

The Lake Poway Trail loops around the lake, but leave the lake when the Mt. Woodson trail branches off to the left, 0.4 mile ahead. For the first mile, the trail is a nearly straight, somewhat steep, dirt road whose saving grace is the view behind of the lake that recedes as you climb. A little over one mile from the lake is Warren Canyon-Mt. Woodson Trail junction. From this point on the trail is more interesting, extending up the chaparral-covered hillside, initially through a series of switchbacks, but then straightening out to climb

up a ridge to the top of Mt. Woodson, 1.9 miles ahead. On your way are some amazing well-weathered boulders, including the famous potato chip rock. Do not forget to check out the vegetation, including big berry manzanita and several kinds of ceanothus that add interest and color to the hike. Long before reaching the top, a forest of tall metal communications towers rise from the peak and define your goal. After exploring the peak area, return the way you came.

Canyoneers are San Diego Natural History Museum volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks that teach appreciation for the great outdoors. For a schedule of free public hikes, refer to the San Diego Natural History Museum website.





I'm wiping the back of my neck and my brow more than my mouth.

ame to see my hero. Antonio Garra faced a firing squad on this spot back in 1852. He fell into

his fresh-dug grave right here in Old Town. Campo Santo. His crime? He yelled, "No taxation without representation!"

Just like the Boston Tea Party patriots.

His problem? He was Cupeño. Native Americans didn't get to vote, not in 1852.

So, I'm looking at his wooden marker, and then I look up. And right next to Antonio is this old, white, adobe-and-stucco house.

"D'O Thai Cottage," says the sign. Thai? In Old Town?

Now that I think about it, a good searing Tom Yum soup might fill the bill. Kill the bile I feel about the deal my friend Antonio got.

Tom Yum's a hotpot, that hot-and-sour devil's cauldron of a soup that could dissolve a rusty nail quicker than Coca Cola. Wimps go for the Tom Kah. It's the same soup, but gentled and sweetened up with coconut milk.

But I'm a little suspicious of this D'O Thai Cottage. Old Town is Tourist Central. Are we gonna get tourist-Thai pabulum here?

Whatever, a couple of minutes later, I'm climbing the steps. It's an old house with a bunch of rooms and two levels. Upstairs, a sunny room looks out over, well, Antonio Garra's grave. Thai wooden xylophones play slow, sentimental tunes on the sound system. Pictures of the Thai king and queen look down from the walls. I take a seat.

When the waitress comes by I ask, "Do you have tom yum?" Love the stuff, especially if it's rated a ten — roasting, spicy hot — to clean out your system. Good things float in the soup, tomato wedges, mushrooms, lemon grass, ginger, along with a lot of mysterious herbs that give it that special flavor.

"Yes, of course," the waitress says. "With shrimp?" "Of course."

#### "In a hot pot?"

Because a lot of places only serve it to you in a bowl, not in that pot with the flame shooting up a little chimney in the

middle "Fire pot? Yes," the waitress says. "Shall I order it for you?" I take one more look at the menu before I commit. ED BEDFORD

> "Tom Yum," it says. "Classic Thai hot-and-sour soup with mushrooms, lemon grass, lime juice, and tomato."

> Oh, I see now that you can get it in a bowl or a hot pot. The bowl costs \$4.50, while the fire pot "served for 3-4," is \$10.99. 'Course, it's cheaper to go veggie or with chicken. On the other hand, the bowl is \$3.99, and the fire pot's \$8.99. But, no. Need my shrimp. On the other, other hand, a serving for three or four is way too much...

I order it anyway. Something about that hubble bubble. No plain bowl can match that.

little tray of four pots, the ones with fish sauce,

Whatever, it is scrumptious, and now, howlingly hot — I'm wiping the back of my neck and my brow more than my mouth. Red chilies line the inside in tidal rings. Like all the best soups, it gets more condensed the lower down in the pot you go. I decide to get a bowl of rice (\$1) to bulk it up. Between that and the fat shrimp and the veggies, not to mention the lime leaves I have to spit out, this is one heckuva meal. You don't need nuttin' mo'.

Except, oh yeah, I ordered a Singha beer.

Here's the kicker: they're doing breakfasts now. Thaistyle. Which means - be still my heart — *jok*. Love that Thai-style Chinese porridge.

So a couple of days later, late morning, here I am again in this neck o' the

woods. I have to make a beeline through D'O's door again.

The thing about *jok* here is it's \$5 a bowl only during breakfast hours. Which end at 11:00 a.m. Half an hour ago.

Dang. Guess the jok's on me. Except, this guy Kan — the owner, turns

out — says I can still get it, for a price. "It's \$7.99 now," he says. "Is that okay?"

Not a problem. I order a koffai yen, iced milky coffee, for \$2.99.

Kan says jok is rice porridge with ground chicken or pork added in, plus ginger, green

onion, and egg. "Great for hangovers," he says. I get the coffee, and they bring a little bowl of soup for me to have while I wait for the jok.

Kind of a miso soup, with onions, peas, carrots, tofu, cabbage. Nice.

My koffai yen, iced milky coffee

The *jok* arrives, and it's a lot. Bubbling like a hot mud pool in Yellowstone. I add dried chili, jalapeño slices, and some soy and have at it. The pork's the thing, but green onions and long strips of ginger give it its main flavor. Suddenly, the egg yolk floats to the surface. It's cooking right now, in front of my eyes. Oh man, this is good.



"Bulgogi' means 'fire meat," says Esther...

...the Korean-American lady who runs this place with her husband Danny. She thought up the "Fat Cat" name and is even drawing the logo cat. They came down here from Oakland and bought this early-closing (3:00 p.m.) lunch place so that they could have more time with their special needs daughter. It's only now, after the first month, that they're trying Korean foods out on customers.

Bulgogi is the first.

Natch, I have to order it. Cost is reasonable, \$6.95. Nice pile of beef that's steaming rich aromas of its marinations of soy, sesame oil, garlic, pepper, ginger, apples, onions, garlic, ginger... dee-lish.

'But the kicker? Esther's own hot sauce, a combo of South America (she grew up in Argentina) and Korea (she was born in Seoul).

"Gochujang." she says, when Danny plunks the little pot of angry red stuff in front of me. Turns out it's a mix of red chili, glutinous rice, fermented soybeans. "But we have our own recipes," she says. She learned it from her grandmother who has been making - and selling – it for most of her 92 years. "But I add my own things, like cilantro."

Trust me, this *muy picante* gochujang sauce takes the bulgogi beef to a new level. Think Mount St. Helens.

Korean adventures, once they get better established here. Not easy, when you've got to persuade customers to come the extra quarter mile from the deli-rich canyons of all those hi-rise offices further down C Street.

A sweet spot in Little Italy

I know, it works, it must, otherwise why would they persist but that doesn't make hawkers any less annoying. I was strolling down the sidewalk in Little Italy, eager to finally see how my neighborhood location for Davanti Enoteca measured up to my experience at Davanti Del Mar. The only thing in my way was a loud man with an exaggerated and very fake Italian accent shouting at me using hackneyed clichés such as "Bella!" and "Buongiorno!" even though it was early evening.

But, once we got past the hawker (don't touch me, dude, and please, for the love of all things actually Italian, like my great-grandparents, knock it off with that terrible accent), David and I were led to the quiet, relaxing, olive-tree adorned patio in the back to dine al fresco. On the patio, the service was friendly and the lights among the olive tree branches twinkled; the relaxation we felt was reminiscent of our trips to Europe, though we were but a few miles away from home.

During the summer, we're always looking for a good place to chill, sip wine, and graze on artisinal cheese and cured meats, and in Davanti, we'd found exactly that. I was very happy when, one recent Wednesday evening, we returned to find no hawker at the door, just the wide entrance, a brief moment of waiting, and the appearance of a friendly face to lead us to our seats. When it became clear we were being led to an indoor seat, I requested we be rerouted to the patio, where there just happened to be a table for two right beside the olive tree.

I'd been craving the "toad in the hole" ever since our last visit, though the restaurant doesn't call it that. On the menu, it's "truffle egg toast, fontina, and asparagus." I get mine without the truffle part.

David had been craving another specialty — the "focaccia di recco," which is thin dough filled with a ricotta-like cheese and served with honey to complement the savoriness.

We were happy we took our servers suggestion to sample the refreshing, perfect-foreating-outdoors salad comprising heirloom tomatoes, thinly sliced watermelon, avocado, and basil.

And now, just for your enjoyment, here are some shots from other things we

Me, I'm backing out to look at the sandwich board just outside the door. The one with the offers.

"Specials," it says. "We will save you lots of \$\$. Over \$1 cheaper than 7/11."

Talking about the 7/11 over the road at the trolley station.

I mean maybe they are cheaper here. They're offering things like earphones from \$2.99. But what catches my eye is the \$1 for a 12-ounce coffee or \$1.40 for soda plus chips, and cookies from 60 cents to 99 cents.

Turns out Ferris, the guy behind the counter, is Chaldean.

"Ah!" I say. "Dichiwoods?" My friend Wissam at another liquor store taught me this. It's Aramaic for "How are you?"

"Randa!" says Ferris. It means "Good!"

It's only now that I notice





Bento, Sandwich, Yakisoba or Salad with our homemade sauces.

Cindelli, the Doberman pincher. Huge dawg is lying on a cushion behind the counter five feet from Ferris. No wonder everybody's so wellbehaved in here.

So snack decision time. I'd love to get the \$1.40 deal, but need that cawfee, not soda. So I fork over all of two buckeroos for the joe and the pack of chips.

But who's complaining?

Erik Thompson wonders why no one has made a movie about the 91X he worked at 30 years ago. Driven by an exploding new wave and punk culture, 91X was one of the first commercial alternativerock stations to serve a major broadcast studio until the late '80s. "To get to the studio you had to drive up this hill to get to this dingy, cinder-block building. We had to create this fantasy for our audience from a shit-hole studio. When it rained you had to park at the bottom of the hill and walk up

U.S. city. Thompson was one of the DJs onboard who were inventing the new radio format as they went along.

"I got hired in '83, right after they switched to alternathe hill unless you had a fourwheel drive. There were moths the size of birds. A three-hour wait back across the border wasn't unusual. Yet it was kind of fun at the same time."

"For the whole time I was there, we had to drive back and forth across the border." 91X used a Tijuana-based He knew 91X was onto something. "You heard 91X coming out of vans, cars windows, at the beach...it was everywhere." 91X beat longtime rock powerhouse KGB in its first Arbitron quarterly rating in the Spring of '83.

Thompson was a DJ/ newsman/production director (responsible for making commercials and station-identification spots). He loved the 91X buzz. But not its pay.

"I was living under the poverty level. Firing me [in 1988] was the best thing they could have done."

Thanks to his radio experience, Thompson started voicing TV commercials and he narrated the TV series *The Universe* for the History Channel. He now has four agents in three cities who get him work voicing promotional spots for Showtime, HBO, and Fox. He's narrated *Crimes of the Century* for CNN and *America's Most Amazing Videos* for NBC.

To record his work he uses his home studio in Leucadia or the one in his cabin on Palomar Mountain. He then sends his audio tracks to L.A. or New York via telephone line. "I rarely have to go to L.A. anymore...and I now earn in one day what I used to make in one month." Thompson says some A-list voice-over artists have their own managers and publicists. "I drive my own bus."

Thompson, 54, says his voice-over career became a lot easier once he became established. "One producer refers you to another producer." He says it's theoretically easier to get into the voice-over business than it was when he started 20 years ago: "All you really need is a home studio and the Internet. You can be in South Dakota and do this." He says, however, the yoice-over

industry is getting competitive. "Now there may be 500 people trying for one gig. It's become cut-throat."

Thompson says he was fired from 91X in 1988 because "They wanted me to talk up records like I was a Top 40 DJ. I thought we were supposed to be a peer of the listener, which is what they were doing at [L.A.'s] KROQ. Plus, I always thought we should use the whole pirate-radio aspect, since we were actually coming out of Mexico. They wanted to leave Mexico out of it."

Then there was the big boss.

"John Lynch never liked me." Lynch, who was general manager and co-owner of 91X, now runs the *UT* media conglomerate. "At some of the staff parties, [Lynch] would pull names out of the hat to time he made sure his favorite employees would win the prizes."

Regarding the format that gave him his break: "Radio has become a corporate mess," says Thompson. "Radio as we know it is coming to a close." He says the lack of DJs with personality and the reliance of outside consultants to determine what music gets played has left rock-radio irrelevant.

"Now that corporations have sucked the personality out of radio, why would someone not just use their iPod [to listen to music]? When you follow the bottom line, you get the bottom."

#### Our Pulitzer pianist.

"This is my year to play," says Anthony Davis, composer, pianist, and professor of music at UCSD for the past 16 years. "Last year, I mostly concentrated on writing, but this project with Wadada is really opening up a lot of performance opportunities. Already, we've done three nights in São Paulo, three nights at Roulette in New York, and this week, we're headed to Austria."

The project Davis refers to is Wadada Leo Smith's *Ten Freedom Summers*, a four-disc release containing four and a half hours of music that was nominated for the 2013 Pulitzer Prize in music — it made the final cut of three.

The pianist came to the La Jolla campus in 1997, after teaching at Yale and Harvard, and isn't planning on leaving. "It's a very supportive environment. Being here has afforded me the opportunity to pursue many creative projects."

This isn't the first time Davis, a University City resident, was nominated for the Pulitzer — in 1984 his composition "Wayang #4" for piano and orchestra made the short list, and he also wrote the music for playwright Tony Kushner's *Angels in America*, which won the Pulitzer for drama in 1993 and a Tony award as well.

*Ten Freedom Summers* is Smith's musical distillation of the Civil Rights movement, scored for jazz quartet/quintet and chamber group, with titles like "Dred Scott 1857," "Emmit Till: Defiant, Fearless," and "Buzzsaw: The Myth of a Free (continued on page 66)



## Bread & Salt & Bonnie

MUSIC

*"I didn't know anything about musicology. I thought, Man, that's it. I quit my job."* 

f you ever meet Bonnie Wright, here are a few things to expect: (1) She will quickly put any music knowledge you think you harness to immediate shame; (2) her neverending quest to seek out

original musical voices will not only make you feel like a lazy pop connoisseur, it will also drown you in a sea of musicians who "you should

check out"; and (3) she might borrow you to help her move some mic stands and rugs into a storage space.

Wright lives and breathes music, original music in particular. She "hates cover bands." After her children had grown, Wright re-examined her career path. "I asked myself, 'What do you do when nobody's looking — when you don't have to be interesting or charming?" Wright said. "I was sitting in on a class at the UCSD Music Department where they had these Thursday noon seminars, and I heard this woman speak named Susan McClary who's a professor. She's a musicologist, and I didn't know anything about musicology. I thought, *Man, that's it*. I quit my job."

Since she started Spruce Street Forum in 1995, Wright has been at the forefront of bringing original, experimental music to San Diego with her Fresh Sounds series. She often scouts bands and artists during visits to New York City. For example, Wright selected solo percussionist Ian David Rosenbaum for this fall's series after she heard him playing a piece in the Lower East Side on flower pots.

A big switch is underway for Fresh Sounds. Nestled next to a bright pink Baptist church is the 40,000-square-foot Bread & Salt building in Barrio Lo-

gan. The series is moving to this new artist enclave, which will host special events, art galleries, work studios, and more. The space is still in the midst of heavy renovations, but Wright is crossing her fingers that everything will be good to go by the time her fall series starts in mid-September.

While bringing concert supplies over to her new space in the Bread & Salt building, Wright was kind enough to answer some questions for the *Reader*.

Reader: How do you choose your performers? Do they solicit you, or do you track them down?

Wright: I tend to track them down. I have no specific criteria, but since my goal is to bring music to San Diegans that they wouldn't hear otherwise, I tend to have out-of-towners. I started this when I was at UCSD. I was working with George Lewis. He was a member of the AACM, which is the Association for the Advancement of Creative Musicians. So, he knew all the members of that — Anthony Braxton, Leroy Jenkins, and a bunch of great musicians. So,

a lot of them came. I had traveled with him...I was sort of his "off-the-campus" manager. I met a lot of musicians, and because everybody loved George, I had credibility when I started my own series.

R: How do you determine what will work for the series?

W: I don't care if it's been done, as long as it's not usual here. It doesn't have to be brand new, it just has to be unusual and genre-stretching. Not what we usually hear here. And since I get to make all the decisions, I choose what I want to hear again. On the less selfish side, I want to give the musicians a chance to perform their music. There are different ways to present music. One way is to try to please your audience. In order to please your audience, for the most part, they want something that is comforting. In order to be comforting, it has to be familiar. And that is exactly NOT what I do. I do it the other way ... to try and say, "Okay, here is something adventurous that you may not have heard before. Let's give the musicians a chance to show you what they can do, and maybe you will like it. But how are you gonna know unless you hear it?" I don't like everything I go to in New York, but how am I gonna hear the stuff I do like, if I don't go?

R; How would you describe the crowds that

show up for Fresh Sounds?

W: Totally different. It depends on the concert. Three of the four concerts next season are contemporary classical. I may get contemporary classical people, but I have no idea. Sometimes they are young noise guys. Sometimes they are people who are just, overall, interested in music. Some are old, some are young. I have no idea.

R: Over the years, what has been the most challenging aspect of keeping Fresh Sounds going?

W: The easy answer is money because I don't spend a lot of time fundraising. I send out a fundraising letter. I have a few people who help me out. I keep it really small on purpose, so I don't have debt. If I had more money, I would bring in bigger groups, but other than that, it's trying to get an audience. I can't pay for advertising. I Facebook, I Twitter, I do interviews and hopefully get coverage from the press. I love to have an audience mainly because it's embarrassing when someone comes here from New York and there's not many people in the audience. But then I realize ... I had a trio here from New York and there were, like, 30 or 35 people, and I said, "Oh, I'm so sorry we don't have more." And they said, "Bonnie, it happens in New York, too." It's the nature of what I do. ■

There's not a lot in print about Mr. Mox, and most of what there is was written in Italian, which makes sense when you come to find out that Mox is really Gianluca Taraborelli, from the small college town of Trento in Northern Italy. If Google Translate is even close to being correct

then Taraborelli also drummed in the bands Sisters and Nurse! Nurse! Nurse! prior to stepping out and starting the Moxsters of the Universe, a five-piece rock act fronted by Mox and his various effects pedals. Johnny Mox is pure fiction, then, a character that works as a loop artist. What Mox does is he records (and/or performs live) lyrics and effects and samples and beats, and then he carefully stacks them in sonic layers to produce his little sound explosions. He also works alone, Johnny Mox does, with a



But Gang's cocktail menu — designed to match its Asian-informed cuisine — is ginning up the juniper juice by bringing back an old standby - the Singapore Sling.

"The Singapore Sling didn't catch on immediately," O'Bryan admits, "but it's got wheels underneath it now." A Tiki cocktail before there were Tiki cocktails,

O'Bryan says, the Singapore Sling came to life at the Raffles Hotel in 1915 where American travelers were looking to add tropical color to their typical gin. Gang's

version, he adds, is a far crv from the degraded fugue of fruit juice and booze the drink had become in the '70s.

"The first thing you get is the pineapple and cherry combined," O'Bryan says. "It's as fruity as classic cocktails ever get. Then with the Benedictine and Angostura Bitters, there's a little note of spice that runs through it."

Fresh pineapple juice is a must, O'Bryan insists — and citrus in the mix prevents the heavy curse most other juice drinks suffer.

"The lemon juice helps keep the drink from being cloying," he says.

When all is said and slung, O'Bryan says, the excellence of Gang's Sling comes from attending to the right ingredients in the right order and proportion, which makes it a good go-to to go with the eatery's entrees.

"That sort of tropical sweetness goes well with Asian food," he explains, "the same way that a Riesling goes traditionally well with Asian food. It's a good fit."

### **Brew mistress**

Craft beer fans may remember the name Red Topper Brewing Company. Well, forget it. It's changed its moniker to Council Brewing Company.

The business is the product of husband and wife Curtis and Liz Chism and CFO Greg Leiser, Admit it, On first read, you simply assume that Curtis is the brewer of the bunch, but pump your brakes. Curtis is an avid homebrewer, but so is Liz. Turns out, she will be the full-time brewery manager and brewer, making her one of a very small handful of women helming brewhouses in San Diego County. The duo have racked up numerous homebrewing awards

and both are certified beer judges.

Council will utilize a three-barrel system. and project annual production to come in at 400 barrels. The Chisms lean more to the traditional than experimental. Their core beers will include a pale ale, American (read: hoppy with a diminutive malt presence), saison, brown ale, and an imperial oatmeal stout called Pirate's Breakfast. Those beers will be offered in an industrial setting similar to many small operations located in business parks. They haven't vet selected their suite, but have narrowed their search to Kearny Mesa.

Originally, the Chisms were aiming to settle down in Golden Hill. The move north is reminiscent of Chuck Alek Independent Brewers, another husband-and-wife operation in Ramona run by City of San Diego residents who had their sights set on Golden Hill but found it necessary to look elsewhere. Council's ownership says they couldn't find any available commercial space in the quaint community. In selecting Kearny Mesa, Council would become the third brewery to open there, following Societe Brewing Company and Helm's Brewing Company.

Company, and The Brew House at Eastlake have all shuttered in the past year.

Three businesses might not seem like much, but considering there are only around 70 brewhouses in San Diego County, it represents nearly five percent of the local industry. Throw in Mad Lab Craft Brewing, the Otay Mesa brewery that closed its facility with plans of reopening as a manufacturing-only brewery next year, and that percentage rises.

On top of this news, word on the street has it that the owners of **Pizza Port** are looking to unload their unincorporated brewpub Bailey's Wood-Pit BBQ in Julian.

All of the businesses are brewpubs, restaurants with onsite brewing facilities. The model can and does work in San Diego. Craft beer fans talk all the time about market saturation and bubbles bursting. Could the first example of this be found in the brewpub sector of the industry? Are there too many businesses for a smaller or newer operation to survive amid larger, more established and successful contemporaries?




### **Double Indemnity**



Adrian Noble directed Shakespeare's controversial play as a comedy of bad manners. Merchant contains anti-Semitism. But what is it pro-? If it's for Christianity, then it has an embedded critique of un-Christian behavior — all of which pulverizes Miles Anderson's extraordinary Shylock. He begins as both wary and chipper. By the end he threatens to tear down the comfining walls of comedy. hat's this? An intelligent, paranoid suspense thriller with no bullets fired, zero special effects, two sizzling romantic leads who don't kiss (let alone hit the sheets), and the good sense to pack a tripod?!

Summer's over. Adults are once again free to move about the multiplex.

Directed by John Crowley (Intermis-

sion, Boy A), Closed Circuit opens on a bank of a dozen or so police monitors keeping watch on a crowded London market. Before given a chance to ponder whether or not Crowley's surveillance cameras — which are capable of simultaneously zooming and panning to follow the movements of 12 individuals — take some artistic license, a terrorist bomb reduces the scene to rubble.

A Turkish suspect (Denis Moschitto), the only surviving member of the reported terrorist cell, is taken into custody. The evidence that the government plans to use against him is so hush-hush that neither the bomber nor his lawyer can see it. Enter Claudia Simmons-Howe (Rebecca Hall), a Special Advocate appointed by the Attorney General (Jim Broadbent) who is allowed access to the classified documents. One snag: there's to be no contact between Claudia and the defendant or his council.

This might not have been so difficult had Claudia and defense barrister Martin Rose (Eric Bana) been casual colleagues instead of former lovers. In order to make it legal, the two must hide their doused past

> nese takeout in a perfectly appointed glass-and-chrome high rise while he passes out on a battered leather sofa in his dank flat. For a contemporary suspense picture that runs a little over 90 minutes, it's amazing that Crowley and screenwriter Steven Knight actually reserve a chunk of screen time to offer a glimpse into the lives of the professionally and romantically bound couple when they're alone and outside of chambers.

> The suspense builds to heights that rival the towering stacks of evidentiary documents, which are all neatly bound by pretty pink ribbons. Two parallel interrogations seamlessly cut together to form one. It's one of the damnedest things I've seen in a theater this year. Let's hope that the Academy remembers editor Lucia Zucchetti come Oscar time. Better yet, snub him and really prove his worth.

Two things keep me from tacking on another star. An unnecessary third act reveal is the film's only concession to Hollywood formula. And for a tightly constructed throwback that thankfully places story and character ahead of CG explosions, the filmmakers didn't know when to put an amen on it.

Some of you have written to complain about my habit of opening a review with an obscure reference to ancient cinema. To you, I close with *Adam's Rib*.




Who among us can claim that their parents took them to their first X-rated movie?

**2 Guns** — Just diverting enough, thanks in large part to the weary charm of Denzel Washington's undercover DEA agent, and the earnest charm of Mark Wahlberg's undercover Navy investigator. (The wiseassery Wahlberg uses to cover the earnestness, alas, quickly wears thin.) Thanks also to a willingness to make almost everyone at least a little bit bad - it's all rotten, so you just need to find something you can tolerate and fight for that. The shared badness allows for a few mostly unexpected turns in this story of institutional corruption and drug-thuggery, and the silliness doesn't really kick in until the third act. (To hell with Chekhov's gun, we've got Chekhov's helicopter!) There's even some creative time-shifting at the outset to help get things moving. Both Washington and Wahlberg can do better, but they've also done worse. 2013. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

Ain't Them Bodies Saints — A date movie for those who like their passion slowburning and risky and their storytelling laconic and moody. Bob (Casey Affleck, whose voice and manner seem to hail from the Great Depression) is an outlaw who winds up in jail for a crime he didn't commit (plus maybe some he did). Why did he take the rap? For love. When his wife Ruth (a soulful and sad Rooney Mara) bears his child while he's locked up, Bob's longing to see them is such that he breaks out of jail and heads for home. Bob knows in his heart that love will conquer all. Some other folks have other ideas. Director David Lowery does a fine job of letting you know just as much as you need and no more, lest you mistake this for a crime drama instead of a love story with bullets. And it's a near thing deciding whether cinematographer Bradford Young or composer Daniel Hart does more to contribute to the pretty unprettiness of things. 2013. — M.L.  $\star\star$ (LANDMARK LA JOLLA VILLAGE)

**Austenland** — If you love Jane Austen so much, why don't you marry her? Or at least travel to England to engage in an immersive Austen experience, in the hopes of having an Austen-like adventure? With Keri Russell. 2013. (AMC LA JOLLA; LANDMARK HILLCREST)

Cowperthwaite's documentary an indictment of Sea World's use of Killer Whales as modern-day circus lions, despite the physical and psychic toll that captivity takes on the creatures? Or is it an indictment of Sea World's apparent willingness to put its trainers in the water with animals it knows to be dangerous and even deadly? Or is it the story of Tilikum, a male orca raised in captivity, traumatized from his earliest days by his fellow prisoners, and valued chiefly for his breeding potential, who repeatedly lashes out in disastrous fashion? Or is it an investigation of our gradually improved understanding of Killer Whales, one that calls for a reassessment of how we treat them? All of the above. Now and then, the stories get in the way of one another, but Sea World doesn't look good in any of them. **Blue Jasmine** — In Annie Hall, Woody Allen wrote a zingy throwaway line ridiculing a saliva dribbling, shopping bag schlepping lunatic who wanders screaming into a cafeteria. We mock the things we are to be. Thirty-six years (and just as many films) later finds him crafting an entire feature around a more upscale version of the babbling bedlamite. We join the everexceptional Cate Blanchett, a once wealthy socialite in mid-comeuppance, forced to move in with her working class sister (Sally Potter). Woody squanders much of his time paving cross-tribute to Tennessee Williams and John Cassavetes (A Streetcar Under the Influence?), resulting in a finished product that has little to show for itself save for a healthy contempt for rich Republicans. Character introductions are accompanied by five minutes of expository dialogue, and for a man with as many films to his credit as Allen, the filmmaker's ability to artlessly incorporate a flashback structure hasn't changed one iota since Take the Money and Run. 2013. — S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE - SEE SHOWTIMES)

Director James Wan (Saw, Insidious) stylishly resists the easy temptation of schlock-shocks and CGI as a means of sup planting storytelling. For its its first hour, this fact-based haunted-house chiller (Har risville, not Amityville) effectively delivers the jolts. Vera Farmiga and Patrick Wilson star as a team of husband-and-wife exorcists — he's the official demonologist of the Catholic Church - brought in to repossess a remote farm that has placed its occupants Lili Taylor, Ron Livingston, and their five daughters - under permanent house arrest. The trailer for *The Conjuring* is scarier than most horror features of recent vintage, and the feature makes good on the promise. Audience members at the screening I attended appeared to have been seated on pogo sticks. **Despicable Me 2** — Harmless fun, like a machine gun that shoots jelly. The plot is as innocuous as the most cookie-cutter sitcom — former bad guy Gru must go undercover to expose current bad guy, and must also deal with personal issues. (One of his daughters wants a mom, another falls in love.) The animation is brightly colored and serviceable and full of exaggerated features: noses, wattles, bellies, stork legs, you name it. And while the humor can't help but plunge into the potty, it does pull back on the one-liners, instead relying mostly on star Steve Carell's not inconsiderable charm. Oh, and there are minions everywhere: yellow, capsular, spouting gibberish, and acting like indestructible six-year-olds on a sugar high. Writerdirector Ryan Coogler keeps the tone even, the pace steady, and the drama unforced: he knows what he's got is powerful, and he doesn't need to overplay. Grant (played with great charisma by Michael B. Jordan) has a lot going for him: intelligence, good intentions, loving family, loving girlfriend, loving daughter. But he's also unemployed, dishonest, hot-tempered, and a two-time loser who made some enemies in San Quentin. In short, a human being. But in the end, none of that mattered. It's a kung fu picture for those not normally predisposed to kung fu pictures. The opening fight scenes — particularly the director's enlistment of close-ups and the kind of accelerated motion that turns raindrops into projectives with every swivel of Tony Leung's Leone-sized hat brim combine with a historical rundown of the various forms and styles of kung fu to give the film its solid first half hour. But after the entrance of unrequited love - a pet theme of the director's that, for once, adds a wet log to the fire — you'll be in the mood for a nap. But what moves with near documentary-like precision for its first half begins tobogganing towards labored, To Catch a Predator histrionics, until it finally abandons all sense of reason for an obvious, symbolism-laced Christmas Eve climax. One kept hoping that writer, director Thomas Vinterberg would insert a fade-in that would allow us to skip forward and see how life had changed in the town once innocence had been established. In a World... — Sharp little showbiz story about Carol, a woman seeking to follow her famous father into the world of movie trailer narration. Dad (a magnificent, ponderous Fred Melamed) represents the old guard - once, he would have been the obvious choice. But the heir apparent is young, cocksure Gustav (Ken Marino). Carol shouldn't even be in the running, but forces - some benign, some less so - conspire to get her a shot at the prize. There are plenty of behind-the-curtain barbs and yuks, but the trailer is never the whole story, and that goes double here: this is more of a straight family drama than a zanv workplace comedy. 
### Kick-Ass 2: Balls to the Wall -

Oueasy-making "real-life superhero" story, not so much for the graphic, nasty violence (though there is plenty of that) as for its roller coaster of tonal shifts. Emotionally shattering events - the murder of a father, the accidental killing of a mother, the slaughter of ten policemen in broad daylight on a suburban street by a Russian superwoman - serve as comedically tinged plot points, while social betrayal by a trio of high-school mean girls is played as devastating drama. The film asks all the old questions again and again: is the hero's true identity the man or the mask, do superheroes make the world better or merely add color to the mayhem, etc. But it doesn't seem particularly interested in answering them. Frenetically filmed and apathetically acted, with the possible exception of star Chloe Grace Moretz, who invests Hit Girl with enough pubescent sexuality and lethal athleticism to make a million fanboys swoon. Lee Daniels' The Butler — Lee Daniels's schmaltzy abridgement of the Civil Rights movement. Cecil Gaines (Forest Whitaker), an African-American man born into a family of sharecroppers and schooled in the art of "knowing he's black," spends thirty-four years of his life in domestic servitude under seven Presidents. While Cecil dignifiedly fights to change the system from within, his politically active son Louis (David Ovelowo) turns left on Forrest Gump Dr. bearing witness to everything from the Freedom Writers to the Black Panthers, Screenwriter Danny Strong (Game Change) spoons on the sugar, transforming the story of real-life White House Maître d'hôtel Eugene Allen into a sprawling, sometimes pandering saga that never slackens in spite of several flat-out weird casting choices and a myriad of historical happenstance. Cinematographer Andrew Dunn's filmy lens can only shave so many lumens, and instead of the warm sense of period, the baked harshness and blaring color design add a touch of gauzy nostalgia. 2013. — S.M. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

- Because Zimbabwe is reputedly among the world's most corrupt countries, bribery is normal and makes the news only when innovators go above and beyond. 


