#### Is Weiner hiring?

Filner staff fired

San Diego — Acting mayor Todd Gloria fired most of the staff of ousted mayor Bob Filner on August 28. Filner left office on August 30. Initially, the human resources department delivered the equivalent of pink slips to half the staff, including chief of staff Lee Burdick.

A few hours later, officials came back and cleared most of the rest of the office out, according to an inside source.

#### **Bring home the Baconator**

Food workers rally for higher minimum wage Gaslamp — Up to 100 protesters gathered downtown in support of "Fight for 15," a nationwide one-day strike by fast-food workers in 35 cities calling for a \$15 minimum wage and the right to join unions without employer retaliation.

"Everybody that works here has kids to support," said Debra Flores, a striker who works at the Wendy's restaurant on the corner of First and Broadway where the crowd convened. "We need to make enough money to take care of our families and pay bills, and that can't happen on minimum wage."

Clare Crawford, president and executive director of the Center on Policy Initiatives, said that employers were unrealistic when denying the impact low wages had on workers' lives, pointing to a controversial personal budget proposal released by McDonald's recently, which suggested that workers should have two nearly full-time jobs and budget only \$600 per month for rent (the actual rental average in San Diego is closer to \$1300, Crawford says) in order to survive on minimum wage.

"If you're a single parent with one child,

you need to earn between \$21 and \$26 an hour in order to afford the basic costs of living here in San Diego," Crawford said. "These workers aren't making anywhere near that, and they're struggling."

"People are still going to struggle because of the high cost of living in San Diego," said labor leader Richard Barrera. "[But] if we paid workers a living wage, we would create 40,000 jobs. Why is that? Because workers would actually have enough money to pay their bills, to put money back into the local economy, to create jobs."

#### **Horses had enough**

Even pet mice taken from abusive home Ramona — Nineteen of the 22 horses seized last month from Ramona woman Lori Patton found new homes over the weekend, the San Diego County Department of Animal Services reported August 26.



Herd of malnourished horses seized from negligent owner have found new homes.

After a herd of malnourished horses was found wandering along Highway 78 near Ramona in May, they were returned to their pasture by California Highway Patrol and Intermountain Fire and Rescue officers. Animal Services monitored the herd, noting that Patton was not providing them with food or water. In the interest of the animals' welfare, ten horses were removed from her property shortly thereafter and subsequently adopted

In July, authorities determined that Patton had not improved living conditions for her remaining animals, and those remaining on the property, including 22 horses, 8 dogs, a cat, a rabbit, a guinea pig, and 3 mice were taken by the County.

After nursing the horses back to health, an adoption event was held Saturday, with prospective new owners completing a prescreening process beforehand. Sixteen families, including one from as far away as lowa, adopted all 19 of the horses ready for new homes. Another mare and two foals, still not ready for permanent homes, will be placed in the care of a local animal rescue group.

#### **Narco Twitter**

Then Mexico began fully confronting drug cartels in 2006 violence erupted that has claimed an estimated 70,000 lives.

Mexico's battle against organized crime has shifted between states at times, but the border areas have consistently been affected.

Despite what some outside of Mexico may believe, not all Mexican media has been silenced on the subject. Almost all major outlets still cover drug-related crime, yet some have laid off of the details for safety of their staffs. A few local and regional news outlets have completely dropped covering drug crime,

yet many in local media still thoroughly cover the topic.

Blogs have pushed their way into the issue, often aggregating the material that is published from across the nation. One of the more popular blogs in Mexico, *Blog del Narco* (@InfoNarco), has done so, but not without being widely criticized for not giving credit to the authors and news outlets from which they repost material.

The social network site Twitter has trumped these blogs for gathering information quickly, by allowing real-time information to be viewed from a massive number of users. For those looking for up-to-the-second information and warnings, Twitter has become the go-to tool. Twitter avoids the wait that major media and blogs require when dishing out information.

I asked Nick Valencia (@ CNNValencia), CNN national desk editor, about the trend of using Twitter in Mexico for sharing information.


"If there's anything we've learned from the use of social media in Mexico it's that residents are demanding transparency from their local, state, and federal government. The reason this phenomenon started in 2010 was because citizens felt they weren't getting accurate or timely information from the authorities enlisted to protect them," said Valencia.

What has proved most vital on Twitter is the use of hashtags for certain locations. Cities like Reynosa, Tamaulipas, in the northeast corner of Mexico, use the hashtag #ReynosaFollow when post-

ing important news in the city. These hashtags are important because with a single click a citizen can get live updates in the city.

A major Twitter account that has helped lead the way for such a trend in Mexico is Valor por Tamaulipas. With nearly 40,000 followers, many check this account frequently for up-to-the-minute news in the city.

I (@K\_Mennem) spoke with the administrator of the account @ValorTamaulipas, who told of the importance of Twitter and dealing with the Mexican drug war.

"It's a great tool, it allows people to get info that the traditional media doesn't tell, or the legal authorities refuse to say just because the political cost it has. In Twitter there are dozens of persons that do not care about the political cost, but the safety of people," stated the administrator.

"Twitter is a tool for the people, but also has its risk, due to the presence of criminals that have their twitter accounts, and even authorities that uses this place as a source of information, and because of that crime also reacts to

those activities."

In mid-March of 2013, mayhem hit the streets of Reynosa. No real count of those who died has been released, but dozens of shoot-

During this outbreak of violence, #ReynosaFollow was heavily used. Twitter users punched the hashtag into the search box and a plethora of tweets erupted. Accounts of those witnessing shootouts, citizens reporting road blocks, photos of bullet-ridden vehicles, and others warning to stay inside certain neighborhoods were posted. Locals gave no faith into what local news stations were telling them. Their only real sources were these twitter feeds.

"New media allows interested parties to interpret the situation as it evolves - realtime," says John P. Sullivan (@ zftwarning), senior fellow for Small Wars Journal, as we spoke via Twitter. "Emerging and evolving threats can't be silenced. Reporters use it to identify and vet stories. Residents use it to avoid trouble spots; and narcos use it to intimidate rivals. New media is the new commons for both civil society and narcocultura. #Hashtags are the new refer-

**Great war for a vacation** With rumblings of revolution and war in the Middle East, maybe summer 2013 wasn't exactly the best time to take off for a free deluxe tour of Israel, but freshman Democratic

congressman Juan Vargas, accompanied by his wife Adrienne, managed to soldier along. According to an official free trip report filed August 19, Vargas and spouse enjoyed the hospitality of the American Israel Education Foundation on a tour that "educated members of congress about the U.S.-Israel relationship." The foundation is an affiliate of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee,

known as AIPAC, a key lobbyist for foreign policy positions endorsed by the Israeli government.

From August 4 through 13, Vargas and his wife were put up at the five-star King David Hotel in Jerusalem, the Scots Hotel ("with direct frontage on to the Sea of Galilee") in Tiberias, and the Merom Golan in Merom Golan, the latter used for a "dayroom to prepare for departure." Transportation costs were \$5970 each, total lodging ran \$2490, and meal expenses were

Other costs, including \$500 per person to pay for security ("AIEF considers the security of its trip participants as its highest priority. A security team accompanies all participants throughout the trip"), ran \$1766

\$900 each.

each. All told, the couple's junket cost its sponsors a grand total of \$19,914. Side trips included a meeting with Israeli Prime Minister **Benjamin Netanyahu**; a "strategic survey of Jerusalem"; and a meet-up with **Mahmoud Abbas**, president of the Palestinian Authority. Then it was off to the Gaza Strip for "Living with the Threat of Rockets" and "America's Role in Protecting Israel."

For those who might not remember, Ryan was the GOP's 2012 vice presidential nominee, running with part-time La Jolla resident **Mitt Romney**. Missouri Republican Senator **Roy Blunt**'s Rely on Your Beliefs Fund also got \$2500, as did GOP House Speaker **John Boehner**'s campaign committee. The Every Republican Is Crucial PAC, run by Virginia GOP congressman **Eric Cantor**, got \$1500.

#### **Mexico beach party**

Vandals live like tourists

A few weeks ago, federal, state, and city officials in Tijuana swept through the concrete river channel known as El Bordo and dislodged hundreds of indigents, who had made the area their home.



Unless officials act quickly, Playas boardwalk could become a lawless community.

Now, according to a business leader in Playas, many of those who were rousted by police have migrated to the beach area and have become a nuisance there.

"We now have a big problem," Elías Cervantes Jáuregui, president of the Comerciantes Ambulantes, an association of sidewalk vendors, told El Sol de Tijuana. Cervantes, according to El Sol, said that before the sweep of El Bordo a few weeks ago, there were about 20 indigents living along the oceanfront in Playas, and now there are more than 100.

"The vandals live like tourists," Cervantes told the newspaper. "These are very nice properties." He said the indigents use the abandoned dwellings or vacant lots to take drugs or as places of refuge after committing robberies.

In addition, said Cervantes, some of the indigents have illegally occupied vacant lots and have constructed wooden shacks in which they live, or use the beach "as a hotel."

Because the land in question is controlled by the federal government, municipal police say they have no authority to act, despite requests from the merchants for help, Cervantes told El Sol.

Not only have the indigents from El Bordo flocked to Playas, he said, but many illegal vendors ordered off downtown sidewalks in early August are now competing with legitimate vendors, especially on weekends.

Cervantes predicted that, if city and federal officials don't act quickly, the Playas neighborhood could turn into a virtually lawless community.

Almost factual news

2013 Pulitzer Prize for Photography goes to A. Source for his photo of Filner press secretary Lewis

By now, we all know the story: A. Source was attending the Las Vegas bachelorette party for Lena Lewis, Press Secretary for San Diego Mayor Bob Filner, a man accused of inappropriate sexual conduct by no less than 3458 women. Lewis, in a move common among bachelorettes, took a sip from her Bride's Cup using a straw shaped like a male member. A. Source caught the moment on camera. Days later, Bob Filner resigned as Mayor. Today, that photo won the 2013 Pulitzer Prize.

In their comments, the Pulitzer judges wrote:

"Sometimes, the most powerful comments on a situation come from the fringes of that situation. Eddie Adams's famed photo of a South Vietnamese general executing a Viet Cong lieutenant in the streets of Saigon didn't depict the more famous horrors of that war — napalm bombing, the massacres of entire villages, etc. Indeed, it didn't even indicate America's presence or role

in the conflict. But the intimacy and immediacy of the image was enough to highlight — to make personal — the larger nightmare. Source's photograph operates in much the same way. Though the genders are reversed — a woman doing the objectifying - and the context is recreational rather than professional, the image captures the warped sexual power-play that infects American politics and, indeed, American culture in general. Also, the way we use cultural norms (Power Must Be Served, What Happens in Vegas Stays in Vegas) to protect ourselves from acknowledging and dealing with the problem.

"To be sure, many brides-tobe suck penis straws, just as many men shot other men during the Vietnam War. But the fact that it was this woman, at this time, sucking this particular penis straw, together with the fact that Source was there to capture the image at just the right moment, is what makes this photograph extraordinary and significant."


Sunroad developer announces plan to name nine-foot Centrum Park easement "Filner Alley"

"La Fenice," named after a famed 18th-century Italian theater, is one of the oldest and most elaborately finished mansions in La Jolla. And for the right price, the six-bedroom, eight-bathroom, 10,000-square-foot home sitting just one block off the water in the "pristine and perfectly manicured" Lower Hermosa neighborhood of La Jolla can be yours.

According to the property's listing materials, the home was

designed and built in 1929 by Thomas Shepherd, "a brilliantly acclaimed architect whose masterpieces have continued to be coveted by true collectors of fine homes."

The house, situated on an 18,000-square-foot lot, wraps around a central courtyard highlighting the pool with glass mosaic tile inlays and overlooked by covered sitting areas. An adjacent pool house fea-

tures its own fireplace, changing rooms, steam shower, and kitchenette. Professionally landscaped formal gardens, "perfect for entertaining," cover the rest of the property's exterior.

Inside, the home has been "completely renovated and expanded from top to bottom," though many old-world touches remain, such as Venetian leaded glass windows, hand-crafted wrought iron accents and staircase balustrades, and an extensive use of marble and hardwood flooring. The "grand living room" has a 14-foot bay leaded glass window with coat of arms "flanked by glass display niches and an imported marble fireplace," and many of the ceilings, including the central rotunda, breakfast room, and a sitting room

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
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

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


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home" system that allows residents to control everything from lights to air conditioning via a smart

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

ollege football is here, and all the barnacles that hang from that cash cow's underbelly are feeding. Let's take a look at the football newspaper of record, USA Today.

Friday's edition featured six sportswriters picking week 1 winners. Follows are their first three nominees.

Alabama vs. Virginia Tech. Lookie here, all six pros pick Alabama to win. Hmm, the Vegas line has Alabama as 21-point favorites. Perhaps picking Alabama is not an impossibly difficult choice?

How about Ohio State vs. Buffalo? Hey, once again, all six USA Today sportswriters pick the same team, Ohio State. What does Vegas say? Ohio State is a 34-point favorite. Perhaps picking Ohio State is something my dog could do?

Finally, Oregon vs. Nicholls State. You guessed it, everyone picked Oregon. Funny, Oregon is favored by 59 points.

Only because you want it, let's find out how our panel did. By golly, Alabama, Ohio State, and Oregon won! Oh, magical prophesies come true!

In that same spirit the Box will offer a pick. General Electric will take in more revenue this quarter than the El Cajon franchise of In-N-Out Burger. Bet on it!

In harmony with the above are NFL contracts. One reads, "...signed a seven-year deal for \$130 million." Actually, the player can only count on money for the season he's playing and his signing bonus. Everything else is IF. But, it's rarely written that way.

Which brings us to the NFL concussion settlement. Media reports say there's a \$765 million settlement between the NFL and players provided, as expected, U.S. District Judge Anita Brody approves.

This year the NFL is expected to amass \$10 billion, making \$765 million less than 10 percent of one year's revenue. But, as in the case of player contracts, those numbers don't tell the story.

There are 4500 players involved in the lawsuit. A settlement of \$765 million works out to \$168,000 per player. But, you and I know it's never that simple. For example, the settlement actually covers 18,000 former NFL players, and different injuries will get different amounts of money, but let's ignore all that for the moment.

Grantland journalist Bill Barnwell writes, "In actuality, the league is putting aside a paltry \$10 million for research and education, \$75 million for baseline testing of each player involved with the lawsuit, and then \$675 million as compensation for players or family of players who 'suffered cognitive injuries."

Well, \$675 million is still a fat check. Works out to \$144,000 per player.

Players don't get the \$144,000 in a lump sum. The money is distributed over a 20-year period. Half to be paid out in three years, the other half to be paid out over 17 years. The NFL is making \$10 billion in yearly revenue, projected to be \$25 billion by 2027. But, let's suppose the NFL's revenue stays flat at \$10 billion a year, and let's suppose there is zero inflation for the next two decades. Journalist David Tigabu, commenting on how much money the NFL will take in over the next 20 years, writes, "...the \$675 million figure being distributed to the players through this settlement amounts to .34 percent of the NFL's total projected revenue over this period." Less than one-half of 1 percent.

In return, the NFL all but shuts down future litigation and admits no guilt. Payouts won't be divvied up and handed out. There will be categories and conditions, such as the age of the player, how many years in the NFL, diagnosis, and so on. And payouts are capped. Alzheimer's disease gets up to \$5 million. Chronic traumatic encephalopathy up to \$4 million. Dementia up to \$3 million. That's top of the line, best case. Most players won't see anything near that. For players there will be hoops to jump through, evidence to provide, actually getting the money, much less enough money, in one's hand will, I'm predicting, be as gut-wrenching as it is with any nitpicking, loophole-looking, customer-hating insurance company.

Three years ago I had vascular surgery to clear plaque from my left carotid artery (the big artery running up the side of your neck). It's not setting a broken arm, but it's not a heart transplant either. About 150,000 carotid endarterectomies are done ever year. According to Harvard Medical School, for experienced surgeons, bad outcomes are in the range of one to two percent. I had the operation and spent one night in the hospital. In and out within 24 hours. The bill was \$103,000. For the NFL walking dead, checking in with multiple, long-term brain injuries, a million bucks is only the beginning.

My voice was often the loudest in these discussions. Maybe I was the head cheerleader of our state of denial.


The truth is, my South-





As he drove Big Red through the city's rolling, palm tree-covered hills, he recited random useless tidbits about San Diego, such as the name of the city's oldest sandwich

"I've never been the gatekeeper of important knowledge," he joked, "but I am the Albert Einstein of pointless facts."

He took me to Mount Soledad, a small mountain near Pacific Beach that is full of some of San Diego's wealthiest citizens.

From there, we could see the entire city and a bit of Mexico. It was a pretty view, typical for a date, and there were several other people sightseeing. I leaned against a railing, my face in the sun, and stared into the distance as Dan spouted a pleasant something about the historic discovery of San Diego. He rambled on amusingly about growing up in the country and the best friends he'd had since elementary school.

I didn't recognize how much his charm had distracted from other important details until he was long out of my life; at the time, I was too entranced by his chivalrous waltz of door-opening, drink-paying, and nose-diving for my dropped water-bottle cap. But though he talked about the Big Wheels he'd played with as a kid, he never mentioned where he lived or who he associated with, and he never could remember my career aspirations or my home state.

Dan was *nice*. Because he performed the courtesies I was raised to require as a bare minimum, I latched onto him like a leech. By the time he dropped me off that night, my tongue was halfway down his throat.

It turned out that Dan, my countryish, uselessfact-knowing, Big Reddriving boy next door, was a meth addict. I never would have pegged him as

that. And when I reflect now on our relationship, I realize that that's exactly what being with him felt like - the unhealthy, dehydrating, emotional tornado that defines a meth addiction. The man who gave me vivid images of his elementary-schoolteacher mother, of camping with his childhood buddies and teaching his brother how to build Lego forts, was the first hit of a drug that I was later willing to drain my savings account to get more of.

My Dan high drifted into the day after our date. Giddy, I downloaded, listened, and hummed to his favorite music as I cleaned my apartment and visualized our future together.

But trouble in my paradise came quick. I learned that, like many San Diegans, Dan was a flake.

He had a habit of dropping off the face of the earth. He swore that his meth addiction was in the past, that he was getting help, but I later found out that the addiction had everything to do with his behavior. In the beginning, I told myself that he was just a guy from a laid-back beach city where never following through with plans was part of the culture. I was an outsider from a land of plan-making and calling before canceling, a world where people cared about things like timeliness. Therefore, it was my job to adjust to the environment I'd chosen to live in. I would be cool and not care about the way Dan acted. Suffering inside, I would pretend not to.

Whenever I did show the slightest inkling of any emotion, stress, say, or frustration, whether it was directed at him or not, Dan seemed afraid. "Shh... settle down," he'd say, covering my mouth with his fingers, as if calming a hyperactive puppy that







was jumping up in his face.

Dan was full of promises and plans for the fun things we'd do together. "I have to take you out in my kayak sometime," he'd say. "Oh, and we'll have to take Big Red off-roading out in Ramona."

He eagerly volunteered to help me get some furniture out of storage. But I had a bad feeling he would not keep his word and made sure to double check on his plans the night before. When he told me things were "good to go," I eased up.

"Relax, Maggie," I said to myself. "He's a good guy." Then I'd repeat Dan's phrase in my mind: "Settle down, Maggie."

The next day, Dan was MIA.

"I'm so, so sorry," he stammered a few days later. "I had pneumonia and took these strong sleeping pills. I was completely passed out. I'll make it up to you, I swear."

"Oh, it's totally fine," I faked. "I understand. It's cool."

But Dan's disappearing act — flee town, then come down — continued until the end.

My post-Dan rebound was a 32-year-old musician name Ty. Despite the band thing, on paper he seemed like a legitimate adult. older than me, attractive, standing about five-footten, with black hair and tanned skin. He had a masters degree in computer science and worked as an exchange engineer. He lived in his own bachelor pad conveniently located five blocks from me. Our normal routine was to meet about halfway between our apartments on warm, breezy nights, then head back to his place. Unlike Dan, Ty didn't squirm at commitment. He feigned it. It only took a month for him to ask me to move in with him, offering to pay all of my rent and college tuition. In return, he wanted me to strut around in high heels with a vacuum and a frying pan. Stupefied, I realized that I'd yet to see him sober. When he told me that he loved me, but couldn't remember my last name, I knew it was time to cut the cord.

He was an entire decade

And now came a disastrous summer of San Diego dating, after which I felt schooled on spotting red flags. Substance abuse, a lack of ambition, and entrapment were only the most obvious warning signs.

I needed to follow the advice of my elders and pursue a healthy, sober, active young man with a career.

Ryder fit the profile.

Twenty-nine-year-old Ryder stood six-foot-four with a lean, muscular physique. He had a pretty, boyish face, chocolate-brown eyes, and a tanned, Southern California-born face. His thick, brown hair curled into shaggy ringlets. He looked like a younger and hotter John Corbett, the actor who played Aiden on *Sex and the City*.

Ryder's athleticism had scored him a basketball scholarship to the California Maritime Academy in San Francisco right after high school, and although he smoked, drank, and occasionally dabbled in a line of cocaine, he was an overall healthy guy. He worked out on a regular basis and was always in a basketball or football league. Ryder worked as operation's manager at the Port of San Diego. I had no idea what that meant, but I did notice he had no problem dropping a couple grand at Nieman Marcus on any given Tuesday. He was usually sharply dressed in dark blazers and designer jeans, or khaki shorts with white cotton shirts that hung open for a breezy day at the beach. He had brooding, intense facial expressions and smirks, and not a hint of carefree happiness. From everything I could tell, Ryder was self-composed, arrogant, and God damn beautiful. 

of the furniture were white. The rest of the décor was black. The bit of artwork on his walls was black and white. When he handed me a beer, I was terrified of spilling it.

It didn't take much time to realize that a relationship with Ryder was less likely than my future presidency, although to be fair, he was blunt about the fact that his romantic relationships didn't last long.

"I'm usually done with a woman as soon as I bang her," he admitted.

"Oh! This is my favorite show!" he interrupted himself, as *Two and a Half Men* popped onto the plasma screen. If you don't know it, this show is about two brothers, Charlie and Alan. Alan is a freshly divorced father who ends up having to live with his wealthy, playboy brother. Alan is a faith-

ful, devoted husband and father who gets screwed over by his domineering ex-wife and is presented as dorky and weak. He is almost always the butt of the show's jokes. Charlie, on the other hand, is a successful commercial music writer who barely works. He sips margaritas all day at his Malibu beach house and bangs an ungodly number of idiotic women. Nearly every female character on this show is either a raging bitch or borderline retarded. Two and a Half Men is a male fantasy, and Charlie is the hero that most male viewers, including Ryder, idolize.

"I'm going to be just like that guy when I'm 40," Ryder laughed.

Ryder was exceptionally open with me about the many women he'd snagged. "Oh my God," he said, rolling his eyes

after checking his phone. "This slut will *not* leave me alone."

Holding his cell out for my inspection, he flipped through photos of a firm, bare, flawless ass, a black, lacy thong running right because that sort of treatment is unusual in this area, women sink their teeth into them like a starving, stray dog scarfing table scraps — even if the scraps are moldy and stale.

After Ryder, I began to divide San Diego men into three categories. First, there were the mediocre, underachieving lads, like Dan. They're *supposed* to be the nice guys, with their unleashed bits of warm, gentlemanly charm. And

like Ty, eager for commitment, but damaged and in need of mothering. The Tys are dangerous territory for ladies fed up with monogamy phobics.

Finally, there were the men like Ryder. These present such a rare, together package that they exert a gravitational pull on all females in proximity, and that allows Ryders to relish the endless merrygo-round of available

snatch.

Syndrome.

They all share one attribute: immaturity.

A girlfriend of mine once said that Southern California men had Peter Pan

"They don't want to grow up," she told me. "And So-Cal's sunny beaches, stacked with gorgeous, insecure women, are their Neverland."

We were drinking cocktails and bitching about our dating frustrations. At the time, I was still seeing Dan and stressing over one of his MIA episodes.

"He says he's not ready for a relationship." I rolled my eyes. "He's twentyfreaking-eight years old and not that attractive. What the hell is he holding out for?"

"Funny how they always give you the 'I'm not ready for a serious relationship' line *after* they have sex with you, never before," she scoffed.


My friend's theory about Peter Pan Syndrome is that, because Southern California is so full of beautiful women, women are held to a higher physical standard and, therefore, have significantly steeper competition than in other areas of the country. Your self-esteem takes a blow. Then, with so many stunners in So-Cal, the men become spoiled. They can toss any one woman aside knowing that another will come right along. Already insecure, the ladies tolerate it, so men rarely feel the need to work for a monogamous relationship. They get bored easily. They want *more*.

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At 23, I left San Diego to venture north to UC Berkeley, an entire planet apart from the southland's counterparts. Then I traveled the world, eventually landing back in the American South, a region with its own cultural flaws. I did, however, acquire higher-quality dates there than in my party-girl heyday. I still encountered Peter Pans, but not as intensely or frequently as in San Diego.

I assumed that my lower infection levels had more to do with my age than my location: a 22-year-old will put up with a hell of a lot more crap than a 28-year-old.

Meanwhile, I kept tabs with my San Diego sisters. They told me amusingly horrific tales of the mating rituals of Neverland.

There was Yolanda's stint with Pablo, a 30-year-

old Navy veteran who resided in a Spring Valley bachelor pad of five men. Pablo spent his evenings demanding that a rotation of obedient women fetch his beers and make him sandwiches.

There was Tiger, my ravishing, tattooed, punk-rock Barbie doll friend, who was unexpectedly dumped by her hobbit boyfriend. "He said he couldn't imagine being with the same person forever," she said of the birthday-breakup fiasco. "I had no idea. We had amazing chemistry and never talked about marriage. He just assumed that's what I wanted. I noticed that he had a wandering eye, but I tried not to think much of it until he ended it."

My friend Jaclyn, a busty brunette beauty and current *Playboy* employee, reflected on her San Diego dating days as a bigger girl with trauma and bitterness. "I eventually lost the weight after a series of insane diets and surgery," she said in a jaded tone. "But when I lived in San Diego, I was a plus-size model, and that environment made me loathe myself. I worked hard. I made straight A's in college. I was ambitious, but I never felt smart, skinny, or pretty enough. [Extra] weight is extremely looked down upon. When I was able to get a boyfriend, I felt used. I was always picking up the tab or forking over their car payments."

"Look how popular Charlie Sheen is," pointed out Bailey, a 31-year-old San Diego resident who recently separated from a 45-year-old Peter Pan. "This is who even middleaged men are looking up to."

"All it takes is a stroll

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
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down the Garnett strip to see it," said Yolanda. "There's always those tanned, greased-up 35-year-olds pounding shots on a Monday afternoon."

Even the 50- and 60-something mothers of friends were dealing with seniors who didn't want to be tied down. "My last boyfriend told me our relationship wasn't going anywhere," Melinda, a twice-divorced 58-yearold mother, said of an ex she'd dated steadily for three years. "My response was 'You're 70. Where the hell can it go?"

And while every San Diego female I've spoken to swears the city is infested with Peter Pans, every male admits to being one, or having been one in the past.

"Peter Pan syndrome is absolutely worse in San Diego," admits Dane, a 35-year-old man who is a recovering Peter Pan. "Up until last October, my goal in life was to bang as many girls as possible. I'm from Northern California, and there's more pressure there to find a wife while you're in your 20s. In San Diego, you're not as pushed to become an adult. You're actually afraid of it. You're in denial of your age."

Is San Diego the ideal Neverland? Many I've talked to say yes.

"Most people tend to get more promiscuous in the summertime," Bailey says. "They're in vacation mode. They're going to parties, traveling out of town, and wearing more revealing clothing. They couple-up more during the colder seasons — but then there are no seasons in San Diego. It's always summer."

"There's a lot of trust fund babies with no responsibilities here," says Jaclyn, who now lives in Los Angeles. "Cities like L.A. and San Francisco are more cutthroat. People are pursuing their careers, and you have to really fight to survive. But San Diego is where so many rich people go to retire. They've got their overgrown momma's boys hanging around with no ambition and plenty of

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cash at their disposal."

Lisa, a 32-year-old San Diego lifer, says that tourism and new residents are major contributors to the Neverland atmosphere. "Not only is San Diego a big vacation spot, but people come from all over the country to live here. This is a major military town. That brings in a lot of young guys who want to party. People come to have a good time at the beach, not to buckle down and start a family."

There may be a lot of Peter Pans in San Diego, but there is a corresponding glut of young, thin, tight, busty, and easy-tonail Wendys.

"I don't think all San Diego men are assholes," Yolanda explains. "They just have such a huge pool of pretty girls to choose from. This isn't familyoriented Wisconsin. San Diego is all about partying and getting tan, five-footseven blondes with big tits and gorgeous bodies. Can you blame them? The people make up a big part of San Diego's scenery."

Every female I interviewed swore that the Peter Pan Syndrome was the result of more females than males, but the U.S. Census Bureau disagrees. In 2012, there were 2.57 percent more males than females in San Diego.

Seeing that, I remembered why my friends and I always called it Man Diego.

My days in San Diego were anything but traditional. Southern California beach life was wild and free. It was the norm for women to strut outdoors in bikinis under the continuously blazing sun. Everyone kept their sexuality out in the open, like liberated flower children. Men weren't expected to court women, to pay for things, or even to keep to their plans. Monogamy was practiced by few.

And yet, for some reason, the girls I've known believed they *needed* men. And I was one of them, one of the many who willingly and repeatedly were treated like crap. Why did we put up with it?

My female peers and I grew up believing that males have an innate advantage: since women have nearly 30 to 40 fewer baby-making years than men, our gender feels more pressure to settle down and procreate. Women, we've been told, are programmed to nurture, men to spread their seed. Men are sexual, women are emotional. Our

one little bit of power is the ability to call the shots on the when and where of getting it on.

But with power comes responsibility. It is our duty to insist on morality in intimacy, a tricking proposition. If we spread our legs too late, we're prudes. Too soon, and we're whores. Men slutshame us. We slut-shame each other. And we slutshame ourselves.

There are probably dozens of ways for Wendys to dodge the Peter Pans of Neverland. Ditch trendy bars for art shows, museums, or coffee shops. Or leave Neverland altogether for the realities of chilly winters and belly bloat wrapped in Christmas sweaters. Or, ironically, celebrate a root cause of Peter Pan Syndrome: women do not need men.

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
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

spondents: The Rise of Civic Media Curation in Urban Warfare, listed the top four hashtags that have been used when reporting local crime in Mexico:

> #MtyFollow (Monterrey.) #ReynosaFollow.

#Saltillo.

#VerFollow (Veracruz.)

Twitter users in Baja California use hashtags such as #Baja, #BajaCalifornia, #Tijuana, and #TJ. Crime has overall lowered in the state, and broad daylight shootouts rarely occur. Baja California is home to multiple news agencies who report up-todate news on drug crime (@ ElMexicanOnline, @AFNTijuana) as opposed to outlets in Tamaulipas, which heavily under-report on the subject.

During July, #Elecciones2013 was used across the nation to discuss elections. The hashtag was heavily used in Baja California to discuss a number of controversies.

Andrés Monroy-Hernández (@andresmh), a researcher at Microsoft Research who worked on the The New War Correspondents study, gave some insight on the topic after I contacted him on Twitter. I

asked if Twitter information should be trusted. "People need to develop new media literacy skills that enable them to assess the veracity of information online and offline. So I think information on social media should be trusted as much or as little as any other source of information," replied Monroy-Hernández. "Being skeptical online is particularly important."

I asked Tristan Reed, Mexico Security Analyst for Stratfor Global Intelligence (@Stratfor), to explain if organized crime and gang members are using Twitter, and if they are able to disrupt the valuable information sharing between citizens. "Organized crime uses social media for propaganda extensively and individuals involved in organized crime use services like twitter just as everyone else. They also have access to the same information social media users report on. Social media coverage on military and police operations can also benefit the criminals at times. Criminals in Mexico are frequently attempting to disrupt sharing of information on social media through fear; however, they will never be able to halt the proliferation."

Reed continued, "Twitter users reporting on criminal activities in Mexico need to be aware of their own safety when posting, organized crime may not be able to stop reporting as a whole but criminals would not hesitate to target specific individuals as opportunities arise. Anonymity with social media is relative, not absolute; there's always a chance for an 'anonymous' user to be targeted." said Reed.

Local movements against organized crime have also benefited from the options Twitter provides. In the state of Coahuila, an organization that associates itself with the group Anonymous (@YourAnonNews), has waged a battle against corrupt politicians and the drug cartel Zetas. The group has vowed to expose those living among them as the criminals that they are.

A brief interview of the spokesperson of Anonymous FREE ACUNA (@FreeAcuna) showed the group is very adamant about using Twitter in the fight against corruption. "Twitter is important in Mexico, because our media has been compromised. Since TELEVISA and TV Azteca are in bed with the PRI and the PRI in bed with the narcos, we will never get the truth from television or print media. Therefore Twitter makes us mobile citizen

Yet another Republican, Tennessee congresswoman Marsha Blackburn, picked up \$1000. In fact, the only Democrat on Qualcomm's July cash giveaway list was California congresswoman Doris Matsui, with \$2000.

Insiders say Qualcomm has been on an influence-buying binge with Republicans of late, trying to solidify their so-far reluctant support for an immigration law makeover favoring a torrent of new work visas for foreign engineers, who work cheaper than the local variety. Regular donors to the employees PAC included president Steven Altman, with \$2884 to date; executive vice president and chief scientist Franklin Antonio (\$2884); company lobbyist in chief William Bold (\$1346); and executive vice president Margaret Johnson (\$2884).

executive director of the Save Our Heritage Organisation, Bruce Coons, and selfproclaimed fiscal watchdog **Hud Collins.** 

Collins, a 66-year-old attorney and regular speaker at city council meetings, ran in the last mayoral election and will likely run on many of the same issues this time around. Coons, on the other hand, will presumably be running on one major issue - to save Balboa Park from Irwin Jacobs's Plaza de Panama project.

Joining Coons and Collins in filing are La Jolla real estate agent Harry Dirks and accountants Teresa Miucci and Michael Kramer.

Air Force veteran and first-time candidate Kurt Schwab was one of the four people to file a statement of organization to start their campaign. According to a May 2012 report by the local NBC affiliate, since returning from the Middle East, Schwab suffered bouts of depression as a result of severe posttraumatic stress disorder.

Also entering the race is Jared Benjamin Mimms, owner of a Biotech firm in La Jolla. Next up on the list is self-proclaimed Libertarian Mark Schwartz. Schwartz wants to bring "honor and integrity to the office of Mayor. I stand for freedom, peace, and selfreliance." Last on the new list of filers is David Tasem, a tax-preparer in San Diego County.

On August 27, another longshot...and I mean longshot...entered the race. One-time Libertarian candidate for the 53rd congressional district Paul Dekker filed papers needed to kick off his campaign. According to his congressional campaign page, Dekker is a transplant from Canada who works as a software engineer and systems analyst. He also served on the board for the Sustainability Alliance of Southern California, a group whose goal is to "minimize stress on the natural ecosystem" located throughout Southern California.

### **Gopher hole** disaster

**Animal rights group wants** painless death for critters Ocean Beach — A man is suing the City of San Diego after permanently damaging his right leg by stepping in a gopher hole at Robb Field in Ocean Beach while playing

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a game of football. The City, despite being fully aware of the infestation, failed to act on complaints. As a result the park has turned into an obstacle course for parkgoers.

The City has been tripped up on this issue for years. Back in May 2009, the Park and Recreation department hired an outside company to eradicate the rodents, as reported by the UT San Diego. Baiting the rodents, however, didn't sit well with activist group, the Animal Protection and Rescue League. In August 2009, a representative told SDNews.com that it objected to poisoning the rodents.

"They had someone coming out and baiting once a week, which we don't approve of," said APRL outreach director Christina Tacoronti. "They were also thinking about using other lethal methods to get rid of the gophers."

Walker, according to his complaint, blew out his knee and injured his lower leg after stepping into the hole. He also suffered nerve damage. According to the lawsuit, he is seeking more than \$25,000 in damages.

More than 8000 ex-convicts deported

Tijuana — Municipal police chief Jesús Alberto Capella Ibarra announced that the city has received more than 8000 deported ex-convicts from the United States so far in 2013. Mexicali, the capital of Baia California, only received 200. The statistics were released over the weekend as Tijuana prepares for incoming federal aid to help with the cities large influx of deportees.

**Baja California received** over 25 percent of deportees from the U.S. in 2012, which included over 126,000 persons. The nation in total received over 400,000.

The police chief stated that a local agency will be setup to help deportees return to their place of origin within Mexico.

Racy municipal drivers caught in audit San Diego — While politicos here have been taking their licks in the scandals of the

An audit of the county's vehicle fleet management operation has discovered that some public employees aren't exactly conservative when it comes to getting behind the wheel.

of fancy new computer systems installed on some taxpayer-owned vehicles that track and store away for future review virtually every movement the cars make.

Says the audit:

Approximately 430 of the 3900 County owned vehicles are equipped with Global Positioning System (GPS) devices that alert management when a vehicle is speeding.

Using GPS reports, [Office of Audits and Advisory Services] noted the following occurrences in a 30-day period:

- Nine vehicles reached speeds in excess of 90 miles per hour a total of 13 times.
- County vehicles reached speeds of 85 miles per hour or more over 100 times.
- County vehicles reached speeds of 80 miles per hour or more over 650 times.
- County vehicles reached speeds of 75 miles per hour or more over 2900 times.

### All A's and a B

Report card says one of our beaches isn't up to par

San Diego — Santa Monicabased environmental group Heal the Bay on August 29 released its 2013 End of Summer Beach Report Card, which compiles data from over 640 sites along the West Coast and assigns letter grades of A through F.

"California beaches score some of the cleanest grades on record this summer," states the report, and San Diego's beaches largely contributed to those positive marks. Of the 74 monitoring sites within the county, 73 received A grades. The only exception, Coronado's Tidelands Park, got a B.

The numbers stand in stark contrast to an earlier report covering the winter and spring months by the same group, finding water quality significantly deteriorating after rains along the county's southern beaches, a finding confirmed by a

man, a Professor of Public Health at the University of Sydney who extensively studies wind farms, wind development has been blamed for more than 200 symptoms including herpes, weight loss, weight gain, cancer, nose bleeds, nocturia, dental infections, nightmares, and vibrating lips.

That's a remarkable range of allegations, given that hundreds of thousands of people around the world work and live within or near wind farms without reporting ill effects. The suggestion is not that residents make up symptoms, but rather that they may be assigning common symptoms to turbines when the cause is more likely to be elsewhere.

In fact, wind power provides numerous health and environmental benefits, as adding wind to the utility grid displaces the most expensive, least efficient power source usually older fossil fuel plants. That means less harmful air emissions such as greenhouse gases, mercury, lead, and the precursors to smog and acid rain. Also, since generating electricity from wind does not use water or create water pollution, require mining or drilling for fuel, or generate hazardous waste requiring permanent storage, it is the lowest impact form of utilityscale energy generation available to our society today.

Deciding the best way to meet our country's energy demands requires a careful cost-benefit analysis; when all the variables are considered, wind energy is the right

### College? Yes, Thanks

We read with tremendous interest your recent article, "College? No Thanks." (August 15). In many respects, this article provided extremely strong evidence for the need for additional formal training by its author, as well as those who provided commentary for its counter-intuitive contents.

At the first level, the article lacked a coherent and welldefined thesis, something that is taught in English 101. Was the author himself seeking to dissuade youth and young adults from seeking higher education? Was the article simply meant to inform the public that there are others who see higher education as useless? Again, one of the earliest messages delivered in a first year English course is that of determining whether one's essay will be persuasive, descriptive, etc.

A second argument in support of higher education is the failure to utilize sufficient empirical data. An abundance of research demonstrates that a higher education not only delivers economic benefits in

terms of significantly higher wages and salaries (P < .001), significantly lower rates of unemployment and fewer bouts of joblessness, but benefits in virtually every life area. Education is linearly linked with less morbidity and longer life expectancy, lower rates of substance use disorders, higher rates of reported happiness, higher rates of marriage and lower PG CUT OFF overall greater life satisfaction. (Data confirming these trends are generally taught in sociology and/or social psychology classes).

Third, many of the courses taught as a part of the core curriculum are life-changing. All cognizant beings find themselves seeking to untangle the mysteries of life. Philosophy and religion courses assist us in systematizing those processes. Economic courses teach us that we can not only earn income from our labor, but our portfolio of income-earning activities should generate interest from our investment, rent from our talents and properties, and profits from our entrepreneurial activities. Music and art, based upon research, have been found to elevate our overall cognition while soothing and comforting our spirits. Literature allows us to experience life vicariously and to avoid the mistakes made by an Othello or a Gatsby.

In some respects, math and science teach us some of the most important lessons

of all. As we learn to balance an equation, we learn that our friendships and loves require a similar balancing act. Our calculus classes teach us that in life, as in derivation, we oftentimes do not know whether we're at a maxima or a minima until we make a change. Indeed, every tidbit of knowledge that we acquire has direct relevance to how we live, grow, and experience life and happiness.

Our teachers, our professors, our scholars who walk the hallowed halls of institutions of higher education are the great chefs who allow us to maximize our higher education experiences.

It saddened us so very much that Clairemont High School Counselor, Ms. Mary Jo McCarey, can make such global statement about "... uneducated and collegeaverse parents." We were horrified that she would discourage underperforming students to not enroll in college! Open admissions colleges use electronic tutorials such as SkillsTutor and other less expensive software to remediate the academic skills of lowperforming students. Colleges such as Texas College in Tyler, Texas, and many colleges here in San Diego County, assign caring counselors who seek to undo the damage done by counselors such as Ms. Mary Jo McCarey by encouraging students to transcend the artificially erected barriers that mask their potential and to fly and flourish.

Ms. McCarey, shame on you! Your high school should be sued by the parents of those youth whose dreams you have tarnished over the years.

Youth, adults, seniors, we urge you, eject the rambling rubbish spat forth in this article from the archives of your mind. Run, walk, drive, or crawl, but get yourselves to an institution of higher education if you have not already done so. You have nothing to lose and so much to gain.

### Los Llanos: Wild Colombia

By Mary Spierling

If you look at a map of Colombia in South America, you see a huge region in eastern Colombia comprising sprawling, seasonally flooded plains that have been ignored by tourists due to their location (former guerrilla territory).

This region occupies over onequarter of Colombia's landmass, but has just a small proportion of its inhabitants. Mostly *Llaneros*, or Colombian cowboys, living on huge *fincas* (farms/ranches) with intensive livestock production — and coexisting with an amazing variety of undisturbed wildlife.

The city of Villavicencio, the capital of the department/state of Meta, is the starting point for exploration into Los Llanos. As you drive from Bogota in the cool Andes mountains (a three-hour drive on a 110-kilometer road), you descend into the flat, warm landscape of Los Llanos.

Villavicencio (known as the "Gate of the Plains") is the perfect base for hiking, wildlife watching, horseback riding, and boat trips on the many rivers and lakes. Many of the *fincas* around this area accommodate tourists. If you don't speak Spanish, you can make reservations through online Colombian travel agencies. Most tourists arrange transport via small aircraft due to lack of infrastructure — I'd recommend this especially if you're on a time budget.

The one place you have to visit when in Los Llanos is the Hato La Aurora Reserve, which consists of a sprawling 17,000 hectares and is home to over 350 bird species and animals, including giant anteaters, iguanas,

jaguar, capybaras, and caimans.

The Ecolodge Juan Solito in the reserve has rooms made with local materials. One morning, the guides took us to another *finca* that was like going on a mini-safari; lagoons were full of caiman and turtles and capybaras (the largest rodent in the world, they look like giant brown guinea pigs). Everywhere we went there were exotic birds, including stork-like gabanes, hyacinth macaws, and flamingoes.

One day a six-meter anaconda was spotted by fishermen at a fishing pool in the reserve. The fishermen picked up the snake and moved it to a more remote pool. We were told that these snakes are quite common here in Los Llanos — which was a little scary as we were walking around.

### History-rich Mechelen, Belgium

San Diego Outdoors with the Museum Canyoneers

### **VIEJAS MOUNTAIN**

Enjoy great views of San Diego all the way up to the top of Viejas Mountain, which is green again after the Cedar Fire in 2003.

Distance from downtown San Diego: 32 miles. Allow 45 minutes driving time (Cleveland National Forest, Alpine). From I-8 exit north on Tavern Road then keep to the right onto Victoria Park Terrace until the T-crossing at the Alpine Cemetery, Turn left on West Victoria Drive, At 1.4 miles, turn left on Anderson Road passing the water towers on the right where it veers to the left onto Boundary Truck Trail West for approximately 0.3 mile on dirt road to park at the trailhead. There will be a break in the fence with a small brown "hiker" sticker on the post. A Forest Service Adventure pass is required. There are no facilities.

Hiking length: 3 miles out and back. Difficulty: Difficult because of washouts, loose rocks, and slick in places, 1500 feet elevation gain/loss, Strongly recommend carrying at least two liters of water. Wear sturdy shoes and use trekking poles for this single-track trail. Dogs are allowed.



The sheltered top of Viejas Mountain is a good place to enjoy the views.


iejas Mountain is a sacred mountain to the Kumeyaay Indians who made a pilgrimage to the summit to watch the sun

rise over Buckman Peak for winter solstice. A marker made of rocks pointed 16 miles to the southeast to the 4641-foot peak and was

used to help create a windbreak in the 1970s.

Flowers abound in the spring. including yucca and ceanothus, with hummingbirds and swallowtail butterflies that are delightful. Shrub oak, felt-leafed yerba santa, chamise, and manzanita blanket the mountain that is green again, ten years after the 2003 Cedar Fire scoured the mountain.

Starting at 2700 feet, the trail begins with a gentle slope and then starts to climb relentlessly at an average grade of 20 percent. Stop and look at the amazing views of San Diego County's valleys and mountains as you climb. FI Caion Mountain in its vast granite glory will be behind you. As 3000 feet is reached, Palomar and San Jacinto mountains come into view with San Gorgonio Mountain visible at 3300 feet. The views



just keep getting better as you

At 3840 feet you can take a climbing break with an inviting flat stretch of the trail. This is a good place to look for the El Capitan Reservoir, name the peaks that are visible, or find the Coronado Islands or even the plateau in Rosarito in Baja California, Mexico! When you reach the saddle at 4100 feet, Cuyamaca Peak, the second highest mountain of San Diego County, comes into view along with the desert peaks to the east and the Viejas Casino at your feet. From the saddle, reaching the summit is a short walk northerly with 80 feet of vertical gain. If a

Santa Ana wind is blowing, it may get windy but the visibility is best. At the 4187-foot summit, there is a rock wind shelter with a boulder in the center. Sit and enjoy the beauty of the granitic peaks of San Diego County before returning on the same trail.

The hike is enjoyable all year long, but it can be very hot in the summer months, so start early. Look back along the trail climbing to the summit and know your comfort level for the return as the descent is on those same loose rocks, washouts, and slick areas. The chance of having the mountain

to yourself is very high as this is a trail less traveled. If the hike is started in the cooler part of the evening, let a friend know what time you plan to return and bring strong headlamps to use on the trail as it is pitch black when the sun sets

the guest rooms, along with dark nooks good for contemplative moments or just checking email.

What to do: At the time of the Crusades in the 12th and 13th centuries, an order of beguines started to organize in Mechelen. Beguines were usually, but not always, women of great wealth who didn't want to share their fortunes with a husband or join a convent. They were very pious, and thus eventually won the grudging support of the Church to live on their own terms. Many worked creating lace. The society lasted through the 20th Century in town, with one last very elderly survivor.

In 1471, Charles the Bold granted the beguinage the right to brew beer without paying taxes. The brewery was owned by the beguinage until 1865, when it was purchased by a lay family. It's known as Het Anker and is still in the beguines' neighborhood. You can visit the facilities, which now include a distillery, brasserie with recipes incorporating beer, and a hotel where their logo is "sleep between the sheets at the brewery."

The Dossin Barracks had nothing

to do with religion for centuries: they were soldiers' barracks going back to the Hapsburg Empire. Then, in 1942, they were used as the marshaling point for all the Jews and gypsies of Belgium and northern France — to be herded onto trains taking them directly to their murders at Auschwitz.

Shamefully, the barracks were allowed to be developed into "luxury apartments." Sure enough, there are people cheerfully living there with little white Belgian lace curtains fluttering in the breeze. However, across the street — not in the barracks — a moving museum has been built. Kazerne Dossin is beautifully organized; the increasing stages of oppression to the local Jews are divided between several floors. The progression is terrifying, but a must-see.

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

San Diego Reader: What is your favorite subject on which to preach?

PH: I think the whole concept that we're born again — we're new creatures and new creations and everything we do in life flows from that. I always like to point back to God's love and here's how He made you

into a new creation — so it should affect every aspect of your life.

SDR: What is your main concern as a member of the clergy?

PH: We misunderstand the grace of God and don't really see the grace of God. It goes back to our identity as Christians. The world and the church can look at Jesus as a get-out-of-hell-for-free card. But I think with Christ it's so much more than that. I think God has so many awesome plans for people in this world and if people only gave Him a chance — Christians included — they'd find out that this faith isn't only about avoiding hell but about living for eternity

with God. The opportunity I have for that begins now. Even in my own church I'll ask, "Do you realize the gifts and opportunity we have? It's right at our fingertips. If we don't realize it then the world, which looks at us as an example, will be wondering why they need this faith. You don't live any differently than we do."

**SDR**: Why did you become a minister in the first place? PH: I was saved when I was 19. I was always told that Jesus was God but I was lost and lonely, depressed, hooked on drugs and realized I was going to go to jail or die looking for some meaning in life. Honestly, I tried Jesus at different times

but didn't think that religion or Jesus was really the answer — I thought it was a crutch for people. I didn't see Christians as different from anyone else. Then one day God spoke to my heart and said, "You know, it's not about religion; it's about a relationship with Me. I want to give you a new life and a new heart." When He said that, I didn't know if it was going to work or not — I thought I had nothing to lose since my life was in the toilet anyway. I decided to give it a shot and I wouldn't hold back anything. It lit me up like a rocket. My eyes opened up — and I could see God working 100 percent in my

life. When that happened, I never thought to be a pastor, but I just couldn't shut up about Iesus. It was all that mattered in my life at that point. So, then, eventually people suggested I should

talk and preach about him. **SDR**: What is the mission of vour church?

PH: Love God and love people. We have an official mission, which is to reach the lost and make disciples of Jesus Christ - but it comes down to loving God and loving other people. SDR: Where do you go when

vou die?

PH: If you have Jesus Christ, you spend eternity in Heaven — which is a real, physical place. If you don't have Jesus Christ as your lord and savior, you spend an eternity separated from Him — and that's hell.



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

### The view from the top

An uncertain economy, in tandem with the rise of gastropubs, upscale comfort food joints, and other trends driven to tiresome status by their ubiquity, have rendered fine-dining establishments to endangered-species status in San Diego County. Flatbreads, mussels, burgers, pork belly, and the like are fantastic for everyday fare, but when it comes to dining as an event, I contend it requires a skilled chef reaching higher than the status quo to create innovative, technically perfect cuisine. So, my top ten celebrates the best of the white-linen *class* — *special places where the service* is exquisite, rusticity nonexistent, and the food divine enough to justify the splurge factor.

### Bellamy's

417 W. Grand Avenue, Escondido, 760-747-5000 Since falling in love with the restaurant industry, I've been in search of one that follows the European model a worldly master chef bringing up a brigade of hungry young talents while putting out stunning food worth setting dates and traveling miles for. And I've finally found it...in Escondido of all places. Master French chef Patrick Ponsaty, formerly of Mistral and El Bizcocho, has taken the role of mentor at this quaint eatery and is molding young minds who are getting the hang of his classic technique and putting out the best food in North County right now. Start out with unbelievably tender calamri steak served over squid ink risotto, and then indulge in a tasting

of lamb with herb-dusted loin, tomato-lacquered chops, and a flaky crusted pie filled with flavorful braised goodness. Having this stellar eatery emerge in such an unlikely place has been the best culinary surprise of the past year.

### 1500 Ocean

at the Hotel Del Coronado, 1500 Orange Avenue, Coronado, 619-522-8490

Despite at first struggling to fill the void left by former chef de cuisine Brian Sinnott, this upscale seaside spot has returned to the upper echelon of fine-dining options in San Diego. This has everything to do with recently added toque Robert Hohmann, who brings soulful Mediterranean recipes along with hard-earned experience as part of the empires ruled over by star chefs Thomas Keller and Mario Batali. The gems of surf and sea get careful attention and amplification via herbs and vegetables from the Del's onsite garden. But even proteins many consider the culinary dregs shine. Case in point, melt-in-your-mouth tender tripe served in a rich, piping-hot tomato sauce with crispy breadcrumbs — easily one of the most comforting dishes in the county.

### A.R. Valentien

at The Lodge at Torrey Pines, 11480 N. Torrey Pines Road, La Jolla, 858-453-4420

There's no better proof that incredible ingredients picked at the peak of freshness require little more than proper cookery to taste amazing than the straightforward offerings at A.R. Valentien. When executive chef Jeff Jackson first arrived in San Diego several years ago,

he made it his mission to rally local chefs around the slow-food ethos that rules everything he does in the kitchen. And it means minimal but poignant seasoning and cooking methods we can all tackle at home — just not with the same level of expertise. Begin with pâté or house-cured fish, move on to succulent goldencrusted halibut, and save room for elegant desserts offering multiple tastings of seasonal ingredients on one plate.

Wine pairings are expertly selected, to the point where to dine sans vino is to miss out on experiencing this restaurant — widely considered San Diego's best — to its fullest and finest degree. Also keeping Addison at the top of culinary consciousness is service that's attentive and intuitive, and every bit as artful as coffee-roasted canard with koshihikari rice and candied peanuts (and that's saying something).



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

### Bertrand's at Mister A's

2550 Fifth Avenue, #12, Banker's

I still remember an even nerdier high school version of myself with a girl on my nervously shaky arm stepping out from the elevator and into this top-floor, top-notch eatery for the first time. Since then, the name has been altered and the dining room revamped, but Bertrand Hug's Frenchinspired Bankers Hill perch remains at the top of my culinary consciousness. The menu has been updated to fit in with the direction San Diego's cuisine is going — if the food weren't so brilliantly prepared this would be a bad thing, but burrata, tartare,

and pork belly taste different (and better) here. It's not surprising. Mister A's ability to stay true to long-tenured dishes such as lobster bisque, carpaccio, rack of lamb, and filet of beef without having them come off as tired is what helps set them apart in an age when most menus around town look nearly identical.

### George's California Modern

1250 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-454-4244

When it comes to chefs, they don't get much better than Trey Foshee. Proof of his prowess is communicated in no uncertain terms via the TBL3 dining experience — a multicourse

cavalcade of inventive dishes illustrated by baby carrots buried in salted coffee "soil," cured then excavated tableside, and what equates to an entire breakfast consolidated into a layered yet cogent glassful of deliciousness. The advanced nature of the offerings doled out during this format is such that it's inspired the foodie intelligentsia to debate whether San Diego is ready for it. In my opinion, the residents of any locale are up for anything of quality (find me an entire community that demands mediocrity) and that's what Foshee delivers. And good news for those without a penchant for being on the bleeding edge of gastronomy — the regular menu is every bit as

skillfully thought out and prepared, particularly in the case of sea-fare-focused dishes.

### **Jsix**

at the Hotel Solamar, 616 J Street, Downtown, 619-531-8744

Of all the spots in my topten fine-dining list, this is the one serving the simplest food. But make no mistake, the combinations of fresh, local, seasonal ingredients composed to create the complex flavor profiles of chef Christian Graves's dishes are tops where gourmet sensibility is concerned. Instead of gussying up minimalist plates of food, the chef keeps things simple, presenting food that's meant to be devoured versus analyzed. Far ahead of the charcuterie craze that's overtaken craftenamored San Diego, Graves's is some of the best in town. Order a board, but save room for braised short ribs, plump diver scallops, or anything featuring housemade pasta, all of which is sure to be matched with produce procured from local farmers with whom Graves has spent years cultivating relationships. It's approachable farm-totable featuring big flavors and one of the most easygoing upscale experiences in America's Finest City.

### **Marine Room**

at the La Jolla Beach & Tennis Club, 2000 Spindrift Drive, La Jolla, 858-459-7222

Often, I feel younger

diners chase the next hip thing without taking the time to refer to spots that form San Diego's culinary foundation. It's easy to do amid an onslaught of new restaurant openings like we've seen throughout our county over the past halfdecade. But foodies would do well to take a break from the rookie class long enough to appreciate a veteran of Mariano Rivera status. Executive chef Bernard Guillas and his trusty chef de cuisine Ron Oliver have been together for over a decade and continue to draw off their world travels (together, they've soaked up the food culture of well over 40 countries) to craft dishes that compose the most con-







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
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sistently worldly menu in San Diego. They're nowhere close to slowing down, but diners should hurry there all the same. Plus, with the waves of the Pacific crashing right up against the dining room windows, the view can't be beat.

### Market Restaurant + Bar

3702 Via De La Valle, Del Mar, 858-523-0007

There's a reason the James Beard folks keep knocking on chef and restaurateur Carl Schroeder's kitchen door — the guy can cook. Another early adapter to the slow-food, farm-to-table ethos, he's excelled at taking square meals like roasted Islowbraised short ribs and creamy mashed starches to the top of the mountain where they share space with world-inspired dishes such as miso black

cod and egg noodles in hot-and-sour broth, a king salmon and roasted chili "tamale," and an entire menu devoted entirely to sushi. Schroedder's good ideas flow in waves with each incoming season and provide ample reason for diners to keep coming back for more, which explains the longtenured disciples who keep his Del Mar dining room packed well beyond the county fair and trackseason flurry, something other venues that have tried to flourish in that locale (and failed) will attest is quite an accomplishment on its own.

### **Nine Ten**

at the Grande Colonial Hotel, 910 Prospect Street, La Jolla, 858-964-5400

Many locals know this eatery's chef, Jason Knibb, more for his melee with Bobby Flay on Food Network's Iron Chef America than his stunning cuisine. But if you save up for a tasty night on the town, your hard-earned bucks will be well rewarded here. Nine-Ten never ceases to provide pleasing varieties of flavors, textures, and multicultural ingredients. In a county awash with pork belly, Knibb's signature Jamaican jerk version served with plantains and capsicum-laced jelly is a revelation. Best part, it's a starter, leaving the opportunity to continue on to entrées such as duck breast with a duck confit "flauta" and cashew mole, or scallops with puffed wild rice and verjus raisin puree. Few chefs incorporate as many components while marrying them so nicely, and absolutely no one creates edible art like this plating master.

For this list, I've decided to use not great restaurants but great dishes. It gets a handle on ten local restaurants by looking at some of the best individual dishes *I've eaten in the past year* 

### Cheesesteak at Jin's Grill

3445 Midway Drive, 619-222-0106 Tour de Cheesesteak commandeered a huge amount of my time, energy, and willpower last year. In my eyes, Jin's emerged victorious as the king of cheesesteak sandwiches in San Diego. It may be a random, Sports Arena hole-in-the-wall where lettuce comes standard on the Philly sandwich, but hot damn does Jin grill up one heck of a



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sando! The fact that practically nobody has ever even heard of the place makes it all the more mysterious. How does something this good slip under everyone's radar? Maybe because nobody wants to bash his car over Midway potholes for a cheesesteak. Oh yeah, Jin grills chicken, burgers, and pastrami, too. All cheap, all rad.

### Turkish Latte at Lofty Bean

90 North Coast Highway, Encinitas, 760-230-6747

Cardamom is one of the trickiest spices to use right. Overdone, it tastes of soap and nightmares, but a perfect touch with cardamom can take any dish into excelsior territory. Lofty Bean's baristas — certified coffee dorks to a perfectly coiffed north county soul manage to marry the Italian classiness of a perfect latte with the spicy kick in the junk of Turkish coffee. Of course, the rest of the coffee shop's offerings make coffee snobs drool with envy. Single origin espressi and pour overs, Kyoto process iced coffee, and \$2 french presses for those who eschew expensive java. I never pass through Encinitas without stopping at Lofty Bean

### Zuke Tuna at Sushi Tadokoro

2244 San Diego Avenue, 619-297-0298

Describing great Edo-

style sushi demands exactitude, which fits such simple and perfect food. Tadokoro's zuke tuna akami marinated in soy sauce and served with a fermented pepper instead of wasabi — contains more flavor in one \$3 bite than any overblown sushi roll smothered in eel sauce and fried crunchies could even hope for. Every other piece of sushi at this cozy, poorly located, old-school sushi bar is a miniature work of art. Anyone wanting a hands-on (seriously... put down the chopsticks!) education in sushi can get one the old-fashioned way at Tadokoro. Just forget the price, belly up to the sushi bar, and start ordering.

### "Ants on a Log" at Swoon Dessert Bar

3139 University Avenue, 619-528-0875

Yeah, maybe they no longer even have the



At the hard-to-find Bodega Sushi Loft in *La Cacho* area of Tijauana, Ian Pike found that "the emphasis is on presentation and unique flavor profiles."

"ants on a log" at North Park's unexpectedly brilliant dessert bar, but the combination of celery ganache/granita, rum raisins, and peanut butter "dust" blew my mind wide open for less than ten bucks. Rest assured, everything else at Swoon represents a melding of inspiration and execution fit for fine dining. These desserts warrant Michelin stars (which they will never receive due to the unfairness of the world), and I'd be hard-pressed to think of a better place to take a date for great coffee or

tea and a slice of deconstructed cake.

### Pickled Limes at Punjabi Tandoor

9235 Activity Road, 858-695-0956 Socked away in a Miramar industrial park, Punjabi Tandoor has some of the best northern Indian curry dishes around. But the restaurant also had some of the best pickle I've ever had. The best dish in all of Indian food, by huge leaps and bounds, is the pickle. The salty, oily, fermented fruits and veggies are one of the world's great palate wallopers. The briny, spicy burn of good pickle is the perfect counterpoint to rich curries, and Punjabi Tandoor put a huge pot of lime pickle (laced with carraway seeds) out for the taking. Also, get the chicken tikka. Not chicken tikka masala. Big difference. The former is way better, and, wrapped in a piece of naan bread with a chunk of pickle resting in there to zip things up, it's one of San Diego's best bites of Indian food.

### Pulque at Aqui es Texcoco

1043 Broadway, Chula Vista, 619-427-4045

I seldom get to feel like an Aztec nobleman. It's one of the downfalls of the guero lifestyle. That said, drinking pulque (fermented agave sap) at Chula Vista's premier lamb barbacoa joint gave me a chance to connect, gustatorially, with the pipiltin. I realize that's a pretty tenuous link, but pulque is damn tasty and Aqui es Texcoco is the only place to get it. They serve it straight up, or prepared with fruit and nut flavors. The taste is one of a kind, musty and fermented, sour and sweet,

and it goes well with the lamb plates that have given Aqui es Texcoco its deserved reputation. Those lamb plates, by the by, are a masterwork of build-your-own-taco deliciousness.

### Surf n' Turf Burger at Sherman's Shack

549 25th Street, 619-795-7192

Midwesterners talk lovingly of "Juicy Loosey" burgers, i.e. hamburger patties stuffed with cheese before grilling. Sherman's Shack takes that to the next level and beyond, stuffing a "surf n' turf" burger with shrimp and cream cheese. They also fill burgers with bacon, cheddar, and pulled pork; or maybe blue cheese, mushrooms, and onions; depending on one's whimsy. The other thing that Sherman's gets right is charging a reasonable price for a burger (about ten bucks) and including the fries, rather than surreptitiously driving the price skywards with "additions" to a bare hamburger. The tacos at Sherman's are also pretty good, but it's that burger full of shrimp that keeps me coming back.



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
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### Banh Mi at Paris Bakery

4616 El Cajon Boulevard,

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Just thinking about Vietnamese sandwiches makes my head swim. The way the ultracrunchy bread crust yields to chewy crumb. The tangy mayonnaise and savory meats that wait inside. The pickled veggies and fresh herbs. Banh mi are special, and the Paris Bakery is the king of banh mi. Until recently, the bakery had a vaguely sketchy, bulletproof store on El Cajon Boulevard. The storefront just moved across and up the street a bit, to a shinier second location, but the sandwiches are still the best and the "buy 3, get 1 free" deal still encourages eating lots of amazing banh mi. Pork, chicken, egg. Whatever. All delicious.

### Ricotta Pies at Pizzeria Luigi

2121 El Cajon Boulevard, 619-294-9417

Luigi's pizza gets it done with thin crust, minimal grease, and a bevy of delicious toppings. But the best slices are the ones with huge globs of ricotta cheese on top, and the best of the ricotta pies is the slice with jalapenos and pineapple alongside the creamy ricotta. Something about the combination of sweet/creamy/ spicy toppings just rocks my socks. Being able to get everything as a slice, with a cup of soda or a beer for a nominal extra charge, just ices the cake.

### **Duck Fat Fries at Duck Dive**

4650 Mission Boulevard, 858-273-3825

Most beach bars make a living serving up beer and sugary cocktails to collegiate drinking machines. There's no

harm in that. I'm certainly not one to scoff at a bit of recreational drinking and whomping out to loud-assed club jams. But I don't usually head to Pacific Beach looking for a tasty meal. That said, Duck Dive's french fries, fried in honest-to-goodness duck fat, are off the chain. There is no more sacred medium in all of frying than duck fat. "Liquid gold" imparts a mysterious, savory goodness to something as lowly as a potato. All of Duck Dive's surprisingly extensive menu is better than average beach bar food, but the duck fat fries are worth a special trip. After that, order some sternopowered S'mores for the table. You're in a huge P.B. bar. That counts as dinner!

The one question I'm asked most frequently is "What's the best restaurant in San Diego?" Impossible! How can I compare this deliciously fresh, perfectly seasoned, crisply battered

fish taco with that subtly nuanced, silky smooth, beautifully sauced fish quenelle?

Hence, while I'm an inveterate list-maker, I have an ongoing love-hate relationship with top-ten lists. It's fun to relive enjoyable meals and moments, but it means I have to choose between this and that favorite.

Despite all of that, I managed to produce this categorized list of my ten favorite places to enjoy San Diego's culinary offerings.


### Favorite TGIF — Blind Lady Ale House

3416 Adams Avenue, Normal

Heights, 619-255-2491

If your idea of TGIF includes drinking delicious beer at 11:30 a.m., head down to BLAH for their Progressive Keg Friday. Two cask beers are presented every week, for the paycheck friendly price of \$2 a glass from opening till 2, \$3 till 3, and \$4 till 4.

BLAH's cheese and charcuterie platters vary daily, accompanied by local fruits and veggies, house-made pickles, sau-




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






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erkraut, and cherry-apricot mostardo. Roasted Padrón peppers, white anchovies, and Parmigiano Reggiano are a spicy and salty combination that complements the malty goodness of beer nicely, too.

Drinking beer in the morning requires, at least for me, some sort of sustenance, and BLAH's signature pizzas are more than up to the task. Thin and tender-crusted, lightly sauced, toppings like pickled onions, Swiss chard or Calabrese chili oil are unusual and innovative. Even the ubiquitous four-cheese version shakes it up - Gorgonzola picante, pecorino, fontina, and Taleggio instead of the usual parm/ romano/whatever blend.

### Favorite Pizza — **Berkeley Pizza**

539 Island Avenue, Gaslamp Quarter, 619-937-0808

I almost had to wimp out and go for a tie on this one. Regent Pizza in La Jolla has great Chicago and New York style 'za. But in the end, Berkeley Pizza edged them out with their fresh, bright sauce and perfect crust, so reminiscent of the legendary Pizzeria Due on Chicago's Near North Side.

Like any stuffed pizza

worth its pepperoni, Berkeley's beauties take a little over an hour to bake, so calling ahead to order is a good idea.

If time is of the essence, Berkeley Pizza has a dine-in only deal that fits the bill. Pick any two slices from the display case and a soda for \$8 or a craft beer for \$10. They'll pop them in the oven and bring them out piping hot in just a few minutes. They also deliver whole pies to the surrounding area.

### **Favorite Steak** Joint — Turf **Supper Club**

1116 25th Street, Golden Hill, 619-234-6363

Turf Supper Club has the atmosphere and attitude of the old beer joints that used to be on every corner in Milwaukee, the city my immigrant grandparents settled in.

The drinks are strong and the steaks are well marbled at this 21-and-over landmark in Golden Hill. It's one of the few places I can order a martini and not have to

explain that, yes, I do want gin, not vodka, and absolutely no sweet stuff.

You will be cooking vour own food, but have no fear. The staff will give you all the advice you need to grill with confidence.

Besides sirloins, filet mignon, and ribeyes, Turf Supper Club offers chicken, kebobs, burgers, salmon, and vegetarian options. All entrées come with a big slab of bread that doubles as a steak timer.

My technique? I order a 16-ounce ribeve, slap it onto the hottest part of the grill for two minutes, flip it, give it another minute and a half, and then move it to a cooler spot while I grill the bread. By the time the bread is golden brown on both sides, my steak is rested and perfectly medium rare.

### Favorite Burger — **Soda and Swine**

2943 Adams Avenue, University Heights, 619-269-7632

I'm going to anger the purists, but Soda and Swine's meatball sandwiches are my new fave when it comes to burgers. Yes, I know, a real burger isn't just any old meat slapped in a bun, but you're going to have to indulge me on this one.

Start by choosing your meatball — smoked pork, chipotle and pepper jack, chorizo and mozzarella, beef with marinara, chicken, mushroom cream and provolone, or quinoa, pesto, and feta. Tiny appetites and those with empty wallets will be happy with the one meatball slider at only \$3. For heartier cravings, a two or three meatball sub will satisfy, while the famished can get three juicy globes atop spaghetti, sauce, and

cheese.

The sliders come on a tasty, chewy Sadie Rose pretzel roll, melty cheese oozing out. Messy and delicious. My favorite sides are the hand cut, twice-cooked fries, screaming hot and salty, the fresh manchego cheese, celery, apple, and hazelnut salad, or the crispy polenta under creamy burrata and sharp arrabiata sauce, but I've also got my eye on the Scotch egg for my next


### **Favorite Happy Hour** — Seasons **52**

4505 La Jolla Village Drive, Suite C-1, University City, 858-450-1252 Arrive before 6:00 pm, and for a mere \$15, you can enjoy a taste of three Remarkable Reds or Spectacular Whites, chosen by their master sommelier, followed by a full pour of your favorite, and a flatbread pizza. If you have another fiver to spare, the Acclaimed Tasting features three reds that are rated 90 points or higher by the posh wine magazines.

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ously topped with chipotle shrimp, artichoke and goat cheese, pesto, garlic, and chicken, plum tomato or steak, mushroom, and cheese, plus a rotating seasonal offering.

Those who still have room for dinner will find some innovative selections. You rarely see turkey on a menu unless it's Thanksgiving, or in sandwiches, but here the chef pairs Plainville Farm turkey skewers with grilled vegetable and farro Hoppin' John and a zinfandel glaze. Other standout dishes are mesquite-grilled shrimp on saffron-chorizo risotto, broccolini and tomato broth, and a more classic grilled Kona-crusted lamb chop with Yukon gold mashers, roasted asparagus, and a gilding of 15-year aged balsamic.

### **Favorite** Dessert — **Extraordinary Desserts**

2929 Fifth Avenue, Banker's Hill, 619-294-2132, and 1430 Union Street, Little Italy, 619-294-7001 Extraordinary Desserts is definitely not one of those places that uses frills and fancies as a façade for sawdust dry cake, greasy icing, under-ripe fruit, or raw pastry dough. Underneath the flowers, gold leaf, sprinkley toppings, and streusel are all the things that make dessert lovers swoon — perfectly ripe fruit baked to juicy goodness; buttery, flaky, puffy pastry; moist, tender cakes; dark, devilish chocolate; and rich creamy frostings and fillings. Butter, sugar, and rich cream are the order of the day, as it should be with indulgences such as these.

You can't go wrong with the classics, like coconut cupcakes or tangy lemon bars, but if you're feeling adventurous, try the lavender shortbread or a lemon apple Brie scone. A simple espresso or a cup of tea make wonderful accompaniments.

### **Favorite** Vegetarian — Café 21

2736 Adams Avenue, University Heights, 619-640-2121, and 750 5th Avenue, Gaslamp Quarter, 619-795-0721

Café 21 isn't actually a vegetarian restaurant, but it does meatless so well. The American-Azerbaiiani fusion menu marries local, organic ingredients with homey, comforting flavors and warm Middle

Eastern spices.

Salad lovers will be delighted with the gorgeous signature strawberry salad, pistachios and goat cheese tossed with crisp greens and a light raspberry vinaigrette that balances nicely between sweet and tangy. Or choose lightly roasted grapes, sliced almonds, and goat cheese piled on fresh baby lettuces, napped with honey balsamic vinaigrette.

My Polish grandmother would have loved the pierogi; cabbage, fruit, or potato fillings lovingly encased in slightly chewy but tender dough, boiled, then sautéed in butter and onions. The Cristo crepes, chicken, mozzarella, and apricot jelly rolled in thin pancakes — are a savory-sweet combo that's large enough to share.

Visit either restaurant on the 21st of the month and enjoy a glass of sangria for 21 cents.

### **Favorite Sandwich** — Cali Baguette **Express**

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




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On those days when I just can't decide what I want to eat, I could swear my car goes on autopilot and heads to Cali Baguette Express in Kearny Mesa for banh mi. Something about my favorite combination of grilled pork, pickled daikon, jalapeño, cilantro, and shredded carrots piled on a skinny baguette satisfies even my most ambivalent mood. I don't know if it's the freshness of the bread, baked in house, the pleasant

char on the meat, or the tang and crunch of the pickles and peppers, but Cali Baguette has it all over the more expensive and popular shops that line Convoy.

### **Favorite Fish** Taco — Oscar's **Mexican Seafood**

Fish tacos are as ubiquitous as sailors in San Diego, so why does Oscar's Mexican Seafood stand out?

Fresh fish, of course. Good prices and service, check. Variety, also check. Do this all day, every day and with a little luck, you might just be successful.

Now consider that in just over a year, Oscar's has expanded from one tiny storefront on Turquoise Street to three locations and still manages to be the #1 ranked restaurant in San Diego on a notoriously fickle social media site. That's #1. Out of every other restaurant. In all of San

A regular fish taco goes for \$2.50, but cashstrapped surfer dudes and dudettes can take advantage of their Monday-Thursday happy hour special when the price drops to .99 for one regular fish or a free regular fish taco with any other order. I don't even know how they do it at those prices.

There's almost always a line out the door, but service is fast and friendly.

### **Favorite** Breakfast — Snooze, an AM **Eatery**

3940 Fifth Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-500-3344

I adore the Jetson's retro vibe, the bright, airy atmosphere, and the slightly hipster feel. Snooze's house coffee is grown for them in Guatemala. On the stronger side, mimosas, bloodys, and orange juice cocktails rule. Beer is super local, coming from within a five-mile radius. Try a Bugs Bloody, the house Mary with a shot of Odwalla carrot juice.

My favorite plate is the breakfast pot pie; a big puff of savory pastry smothered in rosemary sausage gravy, topped by an egg any style. I heartily recommend sunny side up. But then, there's eggtopped corned beef hash and toast, too. Sigh.

Pineapple upsidedown pancakes are delightful, tangy-sweet caramelized pineapple cozies up to vanilla crème anglaise and cinnamon butter. The OMG French toast feautures fresh brioche stuffed with mascarpone and topped with vanilla crème, salted caramel, agave-soaked strawberries, and toasted coconut.

### The Bedford files

Boy, so many good places to choose from, from O'side to the Other Side of the line. The major discovery for me has been the incredible bargains you can get in the exploding world of Happy Hour. From Bertrand at Mr. A's to the *Plaza Bar at the Westgate Hotel; get there at the right*

time, and you'll come out under a Hamilton poorer, but pampered, fed, spoiled like a rich guy.

The other thing that's popping right now is TJ. Eateries that go into foods from Aztec and Mayan times, combining with Spanish and Chinese influences — and beer and wine that's actually made right on the Baja spot — take the idea of locovore to new heights. From that first snail pizza I had at El Taller near the bullring, I knew Tijuana was in a state of, well, ferment.

### **Cervezas Mamut**

Pasaie Rodríguez #29. Zona Centro. Tijuana, 011-52-664-685-0137 This little jewel — okay, still a rough diamond in Pasaje Rodríguez off Revolución in Tijuana has cheap food, yes, beer brewed right here under the stairs, but above all, atmosphere. Poets come and bleed beautifully, singers too. You just sit at a clump of tables in this long commercial passage and try to keep up with, well, basically Mexican culture en vivo before your very eyes. Mario Cano does good chicken breast and *papas*, and Juan José Quesada is right there making his beer. Soon he'll be making wine, too, he says. But that's it. The whole place is in ferment. Think Paris, Piaf, back in the day.

### Plaza Bar

1055 Second Avenue, Downtown San Diego, 619-238-1818

All praise to Happy Hour and Richard Nixon! Happy Hour lets you in to this 18th-century tapestry-covered palace they say was built to accommodate the hoped-for Republican Convention of 1972. It's the Plaza Bar at the Westgate Hotel. The place is all chandeliers and grand pianos and marble tables. The HH deal? Seven, seven, seven: \$7 cocktails, \$7 appetizers, 7 days a week. And the food choices are good. Like, when I was in, they had satays with peanut sauce (you got beef, shrimp, chicken sticks), three sirloin sliders, dim sum, a California cheese platter, or a "Spanish platter" (serrano ham, cured pork loin, chorizo sarta, Pamplona morcilla sau-

sage, and salchicha de vic,

maybe 60 pieces of sausage on a thick marble platter), plus hey, a bowl of picholine olives — and for seven buckeroos? All praise to Happy Hours!

### It's A Dog's World

619-697-0168

Catch them if you can. Bessie Johnson, the owner, is from the South, so y'all know the cookin's gonna be easy. But "It's a Dog's World" food truck, often at Mission Brewery, 1441 L Street, East Village, goes beyond standard sausage and bun to really original. Like the Thai One on Dog has Thai veggie salad and Sriracha sauce. "Ain't No Shrinking Violet" has sunny-sideup egg, chorizo, spinach, cilantro salad, and manchego cheese inside. "Goofy Foot Dog" has four cheeses with macaroni, queso, and chives. Really, that Goofy Foot is some dog. So much crispy melted cheese you can't see no dawg at first. Plus plenty of salad leaves. Most dogs cost around six bucks. They also do sliders, some with mango and pineapple. The grilled beef, the tangy gouda, and the sweet mango meat make a beautiful little combination of sweet and savory.

### Kealani's

137 West D Street, Encinitas, 760-942-5642

Kealani is a real person. She's real Hawaiian and a real character. And her restaurant is a real gathering spot for all walks. She cooks a free hot meal for the homeless every Wednesday, and she also closes early for hula classes. She's a dog whisperer.

She also makes great pork adobo — basically pork steeped in a garlicand-vinegar marinade. And yes, it's Filipino, not





strictly Hawaiian. "But that's what Hawaii is all about," Kealani says. "It's a crossroads."

So is Kealani's. Great dishes include loco moco (two ground-beef burger patties, grilled onions, gravy smothering everything, with two eggs, sunny-side up, on top, and two scoops of rice, and one of macaroni salad), all for under eight bucks. But that's Hawaiian, folks. Over-generous food, way-generous personalities. Won't take no for an answer.

### Nate's Garden Grill

3120 Euclid Avenue, City Heights, 619-546-7700

In front, a sign reads "City Farmers Nursery & Café." Behind, a hillside of minicanyons, trees, gardens, animal pens, farmyards. Country.

Go through the gate

and another sign pops up.

"Nate's Garden Grill...21 Craft Beers on Tap."

Get here in happy hour, in time for their huge and delish flatbreads. They're half off. You'll pay about five bucks for, like, "Meat-Men." It has pepperoni, mozzarella, tomato sauce. Or the pancetta, with potato, pancetta (basically pork belly bacon), house-made ricotta, plus harissa, a North African spicy spread. Or one with rapini (think lettucemeets-broccoli), caramelized onion, bleu cheese, and a garlic mix.

Organic? I mean, this is an eatery that hires a full-time gardener to grow its food, right here, plus gals to milk goats. In the middle of town, just south of University. If Nate's has its way, country's coming

back to the city.

### Bale

6925 Linda Vista Road, Suite B, at Ulric Street, Linda Vista, 858-297-2707

I like going to Bale ("Baa-Lay") Restaurant & Deli, because you learn so much about Vietnamese food and the life behind it. Yes, they have pho beef broth and banh mi French-inspired sandwiches. But I'm hooked on Com Tam, Bale's "broken rice" dish. For \$8.99 you get this incredible selection of foods, including barbecue shrimp, barbecue pork, fried egg, shredded pork with peanut crumbles, pork sausage slices, shrimp patty.

And the key is piled under it all: broken rice, part of the Vietnamese soul, they say. Traditionally, it's the broken left-overs of rice that farmers dry in the sun on roads.

The poor man's rice. It has a different flavor, a kind of starchiness. "We like it with barbecued pork," says Mr. Tanh. "We are a sentimental people. It reminds us of when times were hard."

### Spike Africa's


411 Broadway, at 4th, downtown, 619-795-3800.

It's dedicated to one of the great trading schooner captains of the Pacific. You can pay \$25 for a fish dish here, but Spike loved happy hour, and it shows. You sit up to the island bar, near a fullsize wooden sculpture of Spike, and check the HH menu, and what deals!

My three faves, after getting the cheapest beer (Bud Light, 20 ounces, \$4)? A large mug of clam chowder (\$3, and that's a meal, with clams, king crab, scallions, Fanny Bay oysters, celery,






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onion, croutons, and heavy cream). Then a live "buck-a-shuck" oyster (\$1). And finally, the dish de résistance: seaside oyster roast, a totally scrumptious "Rockefellerstyle" mess of smoked bacon, spinach, parmesan cheese, Fanny Bay oysters, heavy cream, Pernod, that licorice-flavored French liqueur, among other stuff, for \$6. You come out ready to set sail.

### **Red Rooster**

404 Euclid Avenue, #119, in the rear of the Jacobs Center, Lincoln Park, 619-795-8684

Talk about hole in the wall gang... You'd never find Frank in a thousand years, if you didn't know where to look. His Red Rooster Catfish is just one window slot that looks out onto a field, far from Market Creek Plaza across the Chollas creek footbridge. Yet Frank, from Shreveport Louisiana, is always busy. From his catfish sandwiches to his breaded tilapia with cheesy corn nuggets (both around \$5), he is the real thing. And his specialties, catfish (two pieces plus fried tiger shrimp, for \$15) and frogs legs (you get three sets plus spicy breaded beans for about \$10) are

worth every penny. Heck, just shooting the breeze with Frank is worth that. "Okay, kinfolk," he'll say. "What else can I get for you, champion? Pond chicken? (Frog?) Alright! Make that 15 minutes."

### All over the map

I'm usually at a loss when asked what the "best restaurant neighborhood" in San Diego is. The truth is, we log in some miles going to our favorite places. South to Chula Vista for Mariscos or National City for Filipino, East to El Cajon for Chaldean or Turkish treats, North to Rancho Peñasquitos for Thai, up to Mira Mesa or over to City Heights for Pho. The effort and cost is worth it to us as we get to enjoy the diversity of cuisine that our home offers. The Missus once saw a bumper sticker that read "Will travel for food," which I've been searching for ever since.

### Sushi Tadokoro

2244 San Diego Ave, 619-297-0298, Old Town

The understated, clean, "austere-zen" décor reflects the sensibilities of the Itamae and owner

Take-san, who uses classic Edomae-zushi, what we call nigiri sushi as a base from which his creations expand.

Take-san seems to remember every dish that was ever served to us, our preferences, and designs a perfect meal for that season, day, and weather. He knows the Missus loves his Ankimo; seasoned and steamed monkfish liver, much like a pate. And that we really enjoy shiromi, "white flesh fishes," often "painted" with nikiri, his personal soy sauce blend. We will often be lucky enough to have engawa, the collagen-rich, slightly sweet, dorsal fin muscle of the halibut, or mebachizuke, Bigeve Tuna quickly marinated in a soy sauce mixture.

Make a reservation for early in the evening, before the place gets busy. Ask to sit in front of Takesan. Sit back and leave yourself in his hands.

### Sultan Kebab & Baklava

131 Jamacha Road, 619-440-1901,

Our favorite strategy at Sultan is to get a variety of *meze* (small dishes), such as *saksuka*, a tomato, roasted potato, onion, and

eggplant; antepezme, a mildly spicy red pepper and tomato spread; and patlican salatasi, which most will know as baba ghanoush. Served with warm lavas, it's a wonderful start. The Missus will usually get a lahmacun, a flatbread topped with a spiced mixed meat, and I will either go with the mildly spicy Adana kebab, or the mixed grill, Karisik Izgara, a carnivore's delight with lamb, chicken, and the beef urfa kebab. Served with rice, coban salatasi (Shepherd's Salad), and tabuli salata, it's usually enough for the both of us.

The owner is a very nice gentleman, who you might recognize from Sunday's Hillcrest Farmers' Market, where he mans a kebab stall. The service is very mom-and-pop and casual. You may have to wait a bit for your food, but I doubt you'll leave hungry.

### The Original Sab E Lee

We call Sab E Lee the "game changer" in our household. When the little shop opened in the summer of 2008, things changed. We suddenly had spicy Issan Thai food like what is served, well, in Thailand. Imagine that! Before then, it

was basically the same Bangkok-based, "Royal Thai" style dishes, much of it dumbed down, that was served everywhere.

Our favorites haven't wavered over the past five vears. We love the Grilled Dark Larb, Bamboo Shoot Salad, Nam Tok, and our usual choice, the Spicy Raw Beef salad — finely diced raw beef coated with nutty toasted sticky rice powder, topped with pungent raw garlic, which heightens the spice. Yes, at a heat level 7 it is quite potent, but it is also quite refreshing as well. The pungent fragrance of the salted (preserved) fish fried rice might put off some, but it is a wonderful savory carb-fest. The Issan Sausage when eaten with the provided herbs, chilies, and cabbage becomes a nice start to a meal.


### Ramen Yamadaya

4706 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard,

858-483-3431. Clairemont

Ramen Yamadaya is a chain that was established in Torrance in 2010. In July of 2012, they opened a shop in a strip mall on Clairemont Mesa Boulevard. The ramen served here is the style of Hakata, a district of Fukuoka. The







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


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soup is the rapidly boiled. slowly reduced, white and thick, tonkotsu broth and the noodles are the straight and thin type, a hallmark of Hakata-men. I always order my ramen one way here. Even though Yamadaya claims to use 120 pounds of pork bones to make a single pot of broth, I still find it a bit thin. Luckily, you can order a "kotteri" (extra rich) bowl. I add some nice fatty buta kakuni, simmered pork belly, to my bowl, and finally ask for the usually overcooked noodles extra firm. The end result is a tongue-coating broth that isn't too salty, rich, fatty pork belly, and noodles, usually too soft for our taste, but acceptable.

### Santouka Ramen

4240 Kearny Mesa Road, 858-974-1101. Kearny Mesa

Santouka, the chain from Asahikawa, "the coldest city in Japan," has made its home in the Mitsuwa Marketplace Food Court since 2008. The broth here is also the rich, milky tonkotsu-style soup, which also tends to be on the more salty side. Like Yamadaya, I order my ramen one way only here, it's the shio (salt) seasoned broth, which is also the least salty. The proprietary noodles at Santouka are curly, with a nice chew, holding well to the broth. I get my bowl tokusen toroniku, with a plate of all the garnishes and toppings on the side and, most importantly, with toroniku, braised pork jowls, full of soyswiney goodness.

### **Pho Lucky**

9326 Mira Mesa Boulevard, Mira Mesa. 858-586-7979

On the East side of Black Mountain Road, attached to Lucky Seafood Supermarket is Pho Lucky. Here it's all about the broth for me; on the best days it's a light brown in color, hints of anise and clove rise from the bowl, and dots of oil are spread all along the surface of the soup. You'll catch a touch of sweetness from the scalded onions along with a decent mild beef flavor. My favorites among the protein choices are the brisket and beef tendon. In fact, Pho Lucky makes my favorite version of Bo Kho (Vietnamese style Beef Stew) in San Diego, which is full of wonderful beef tendon.

### **Pho Cow Cali Express**

9170 Mira Mesa Boulevard, 858-271-8341, Mira Mesa

Right across the street is Pho Cow Cali. Here it is all about the meat for me. The tougher cuts like flank and brisket are usually well-flavored if a bit chewy. The tripe here is usually prepared

well, crunchy, without the off taste of an illprepared version. They have recently started offering a filet version of pho, with beef tenderloin as the only protein. If you do order that, make sure to get the meat on the side, so you can control how long the protein is swimming in the soup. The broth here is lighter than Lucky's version, without the strong anise tones, but still has enough of a beef flavor to please.


### **Grandma Tofu House and Korean BBQ**

4425 Convoy Street, 858-277-

2220, Kearny Mesa

In spite of the name, we don't visit "Grandma's" on Convoy for the various soondubu (tofu stew), nor the Korean BBO, which is passable at best.

For us, there's a short list of dishes we enjoy here. "Hal-muh-nee," grandmother in Korean, does a nice Dolsot Bi Bim Bap, the ubiquitous stone bowl rice dish. The key is to not mess about with your rice until it forms a nice rice crust. Then you can go for it. Add in some sweet-tangy-spicy *cho-kochujang* and enjoy. On special occasions we'll order the jokbal bossam, steamed pork belly and simmered pig's feet served with ssamjang (seasoned bean paste), daikon radish and oyster kimchi, raw garlic, and chopped Serrano peppers, all to be wrapped up in napa cabbage leaves and devoured. During the winter the Missus craves the seolleontang, belly-coating beef bone soup, which you season yourself with sea salt. Most of the entrées come with stone bowl rice. You are also provided with a carafe of water. After consuming most of the

rice, you'll be left with the bits stuck onto the bowl. You drizzle as much, or as little of the water over the rice, loosening it from the bowl. Some folks add a good amount of water, creating a version of scorched rice porridge. I just pour enough to loosen the crispy, nutty, rice crust from the bowl, creating a crunchy treat. They call this *nurungji*; its good stuff.



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### **Crab Hut**

1007 Fifth Avenue, 619-234-0628,

About every month or so, my friends and I try to get together for happy hour. We usually get the weekend started at Crab Hut on Fifth avenue.

So why Crab Hut? Some of it has to do with familiarity. Most of the folks working there have been doing so for a good long time. We know them by name; Wilson, Mai, Khanh, Vinh, and Christine immediately come to mind. The benefit of low turnover becomes apparent when you inquire about what is available on any given day; is the shrimp today from Ecuador or Peru? Crawfish, from Louisiana or Sacramento? What varieties of Carlsbad Aquafarms oysters do you have today?

The menu is full of Cajun-inspired seafood fare, but for happy hour, I just get my fix of oysters and chicken wings; "naked," sauce on the side. Usually washed down with a couple of pints of local craft beer. Simple, but just the thing I usually need after a tough week.

### Where the Diva eats

I have more restaurants in my repertoire than a jukebox has records, and I love to go on new foodie adventures. But despite the myriad options at my disposal with the extensive selection of restaurants in San Diego county, there's just something about the following that keep me going back, again and again. If you're going to find my numberone food companion (my husband, David) and me out and about, chances are it'll be at one of these joints. These are my top ten haunts, in the order of the time of day you're likely to find me there.

### **Bread & Cie**

350 University Avenue, Hillcrest, 619-459-9239

Because it's just up the hill from our home, all the people who work there are always smiling, and it's the closest thing we have to a European-style bakery in our hood, Bread & Cie is our go-to for grabbing a quick, yet relaxing breakfast. David tends toward the quiches, ordering a tall pie-slice of either the Our hard-working diva Barbarella

ham and cheese or spinach and feta quiche. My dad and sister Jane tend to meet up with us here when they can. Without fail, Jane orders the cheese plate (she offers up her French bread and grapes to the table, and sometimes even allows us a smear of

the apple/walnut/onion brie that is central to the dish). My preference is for the breakfast sandwiches, either Croque Americaine or the Artichoke Frittata Panini.

### Emerald Restaurant

3709 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa, 858-565-6888


Around 11 a.m. on a Saturday morning is my ideal arrival time. Sundays are too insane, and that's about the time that more variety starts flowing from the kitchen. Shrimp dumplings are a must on my table, as are the soy sauce noodles; I also have an affinity for the sweetsayoriness of what we call














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"footballs," but are actually deep fried, sweet and chewy rice dumplings filled with chopped pork and veggies. A brunch with jasmine tea and shrimp shumai shared with friends is a great way to start a weekend. We're delighted when friends are available to join us last minute when the dim sum urge suddenly strikes, but we have no problem doing dim sum for two.

### **Tofu House**

4646 Convoy Street, Kearny Mesa 858-576-6433

Though I fancy several spots along Convoy (including but not limited to Tajima, which still has my vote for best ramen in town), chances are if I'm hitting the 163 North, I'm heading for a hot pot of spicy boiling tofu with banchan — tasty Korean food fixin's such as spicy cucumber and odaeng (sweet fishcake, which cuts the heat from 3-pepper level broth). It's cheap, it's delicious, and it's easy, if you get there early enough. I shoot for 11 to 11:30 after that the lunch rush and that poorly designed parking lot gets a little too "I might have to kill someone" annoying.

### The Prado at Balboa Park

1549 El Prado, Balboa Park. 619-557-9441

There is certainly something magical about the Prado at dusk, when the lights on the patio start to flicker and the air begins to cool, but if you find us here, it's likely for a relaxing midday break. Any excuse to walk through the park, smell the flowers, and stroll by the lily pad pond is one I'll take, but the best visits include lunch at the Prado. For me, that means a glass of rosé, and the Farmer's Mix salad with grilled chicken. If we're extra hungry, David and I will share the spicy calamari fries, or begin with a bowl of soup (my man prefers black bean, but my favorite is the tortilla chicken soup). Usually the adventurous one, David steps out of character here and remains consistent by always ordering the pressed arugula salad (strawberries, candied walnuts, asiago in sherryshallot vinaigrette) with added skirt steak.

### Hacienda de Vega

2608 S. Escondido Boulevard, Escondido, 760-738-9804

Ah, for the true escape. David and I call this historical house-turned restaurant our "oasis." A waterfall off the rooftop falls into a shallow pool surrounded by flowers, and it is along its edge that we are usually seated. When we have a particularly hard morning and find we don't get a break for lunch until 3 or 4 p.m., we head north to unwind with a Hacienda Margarita, which happens to be my favorite margarita in the world, no exaggeration. This place also boasts the best fajitas I've tasted, with choice of seasoned grilled meats, and unique specialties such as the Sabana Invierno (thinly sliced beef tenderloin grilled and smothered in refried beans and Manchego cheese). I have never walked away without feeling relaxed, refreshed, and satiated.

### **Small Bar**

4628 Park Boulevard, University Heights, 619-795-7998

People think because it's a bar, it's just about the drinks, but they're wrong. Sure, Small Bar serves a mean barrel-aged Manhattan, but when we head to the tiny communal table-filled joint, we're thinking food. The fried pickles are made in-house, and are perfectly crispy. Great for snacking on, but when I want more of a meal, I order the street tacos (firecracker carne asada with a cooling slice of avocado and a bit of cotija) or chicken sliders (three different speeds: tangy, sweet BBQ, bacon jam with ranch, and Coke & Guinness BBQ with red onions). Everything I've tasted from the menu has featured fresh ingredients and been downright delicious, which makes Small Bar a great grub hub.

### **Cucina Urbana**

505 Laurel Street, Banker's Hill, 619-239-2222

A great spot for business lunches, mostly because you can actually walk in and get a table, but it's also perfect for winding down casual country Italian style, with a bottle of red, a salad, and gourmet pizza. Sometimes I veer from my usual (fig and gorgonzola pizza with caramelized onions, candied pecan, arugula and syrupy aged balsamic) and opt for the frequently changing but always solid fish dish. Chef Joe makes a lovely limoncello beurre blanc, which he once served on pasta with wild mushrooms. I was disappointed to see that item disappear from the menu, but when you keep it seasonal, things change, and for each lost favorite, there's always an exciting new one to discover.


### Wine Vault & **Bistro**

3731 India Street, Little Italy, 619-295-3939

I've never tasted the same dish twice at this restaurant, with its weekly (sometimes daily) changing menus, but everything I've had was hand-crafted cuisine at its finest, for



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the ridiculously low cost of \$20 for three courses (with an additional, and also very reasonable \$15 for wine pairings). It's tricky to know when to go, they've got somewhat wonky hours, but for first timers, I suggest making reservations in advance for a Thursday or Friday night for the 3-course, and even further in advance for one of the special 5-course tasting menus on Saturdays.

### **Tractor Room**

3687 5th Avenue, Hillcrest,

619-543-1007 Just like its

Just like its sister restaurant across the street (Hash House), the food at Tractor Room is BIG, both in flavor and portion size. The upside is

all the leftovers we end up taking home to enjoy the next day. I find myself going back time and again for a few of my favorite appetizers, which work well as meals. The crispy elk sausage ravioli in a demi glace cream is rich in a foodgasm sort of way. The warm wild boar and mashed potato spring rolls with spicy peanut sauce are served on a pile of contrastingly cool greens. The baby bibb salad is great to share, and the burgers are served with addictive criss cross fries. I wouldn't know about the desserts, I've never made it that far — but the skillet cornbread (which arrives on every table) is sweet enough to hit that spot.

### Starlite

3175 India Street, Midtown, 619-358-9766

If I had to choose only one haunt, it would be Starlite. Partly because I can walk there from (and more importantly back to, heh heh) my place, but mostly because of their consistently great menu, which includes my favorite burger in town (Brandt beef, gruyere cheese, and caramelized onions on a brioche bun). The vegetarian entrée changes frequently, and each seasonally informed iteration is so full of complex flavors that even us meat-eaters don't feel there's anything missing. Tapas Tuesdays are great for tasting an array of small plates, and every week they're different but always tasty, and made from mostly locally sourced, high quality ingredients. Of course, no meal of mine at Starlite is complete without a Holly Golightly, which is basically a Manhattan with a dash of maple liqueur.

### Baja makes me hungry

Tijuana and nearby cities to the south have become famous in the past few years for their locally sourced Baja Med cuisine. The fusion fare of traditional Mexican dishes with Asian and Mediterranean influences highlights Ensenada's bounty of fresh seafood and Real de Castillo's fine cheeses, which are served up with regional gourmet

greens and then paired with Valle de Guadalupe's award-winning wines and Baja's craft beers.

Any number of blogs can guide you to the concept eateries pioneered by chefs such as Javier Plascencia and Miguel Angel Guerrero, so instead, I turned to locals for advice. After many a city-wide jaunt and a fair amount of lurking on the over 11,660-member strong Facebook group Tijuana Makes Me Hungry, I arrived at ten spots rang*ing from a hole-in-the-wall* burger joint to a Europeanstyle basement bistro to a semi-secret sushi loft. If that doesn't get your belly grumbling, consider: the recent addition of a pedestrian Ready Lane has reduced two- or three-hour border waits to an appetizing two or three minutes for passport cardholders, making

evening jaunts to Baja feasible for the first time in over a decade. Provecho!

### Molino Cocina a la Leña & Cava

Avenida Paseo Ensenada #121, local 24, Del Mar Plaza, Playas de Tijuana, 01-664-378-0808

The first impression that hits is the aroma of pine logs cooking flatbread in the oven. An appetizer of fresh bread soon arrives at the table garnished with olive oil, rosemary, and sea salt along with ramekins of creamy jalapeno sauce, piquant habanero, and balsamic/olive oil/herbs. Order a more-than-decent bottle of house wine (\$13) or sample some of the Valley's finest vintages for up to \$72. Whet your appetite with, say, a plate of champiñónes rellenos (\$5) — mushroom caps stuffed with bleu cheese

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

Then move on to a main course of woodfired pizza (\$10) topped with Baja smoked oysters, savory huitlacoche, or traditional arrachera flank steak. The combination restaurant, gourmet deli, and bottle shop is Chef Ricardo Corona's maiden endeavor, and it's among the best introductions to Baja Med fare that you'll find for the price.

### Hunab Ku Tacos de Mariscos a las Brasas

Avenida Paseo Ensenada #2098,

Playas de Tijuana, 01-664-609-9551 Opened last November as an extension of the celebrated Tacos Kokopelli, the place changed names in January and expanded on the menu available at Kokopelli's street cart (Zona Centro) and Food Garden (Zona Rio) locations. The open-air restaurant oozes an easy-going, eco-hip vibe via abounding shrubbery (an entire tree plays centerpiece), Masonjar chandeliers, and a handdrawn sign reading: "Bikes, pets, and all humans welcome." The fresh, inventive energy is reflected in Hunab Ku's cuisine, which combines a regional taste for seafood tacos with a stonerly appetite for sauce and garnish. Take, for example, the Garcés (\$2.70) — smoked salmon on a bed of sweet potato with red wine onions and goat cream cheese. Or the Malacostra — a güerito pepper stuffed with marlin, covered in fried cheese, and topped with chipotle sauce. Seriously. Throw in an artisanal brew from Tijuana's Insurgentes or Mexicali's Cucapá and you'll never want to go home.

### La Choza Maya

Avenida Paseo Ensenada #1584, Playas de Tijuana, no phone number

Rosarito-style perrones (a la Tacos el Yaqui and El Gerente) take center stage at this beach town taco hut. Cuts of sinewy arrachera (abdominal beef steak) are grilled to medium-rare over live oak for about seven minutes and then stewed until tender. The classic Taco Perron (\$2.70) sees the nowsucculent bovine served on a flour tortilla with guacamole, onion, cilantro, whole beans, melted Monterrey cheese, and a splash of salsa. That's it. More on the health-conscious tip, the Taco Integral (\$2.70) gives nods to Argentinian gastronomy by presenting arrachera in a bed of organic spring mix and pan-fried panela cheese garnished with fresh chimichurri on a wheat tortilla. But the secret star of La Choza Maya is the Taco Mayo

(\$3.40) — infinitely juicy cubes of chicken breast and marinated Portobellos sprinkled in fine herbs, doused with habanero sauce, and smothered in grated cheese. You've never tasted cluck like this.

### Bodega Sushi Loft Avenida Guanajuato #2730, Colonia

Cacho, Tijuana, 01-664-200-2332 Located on the ritzy but hip avenues of "La Cacho," Bodega isn't exactly hidden, but you have to look for it. Find their logo on a pea-green warehouse, then follow the stairs around the side. The concept is classy and considered, with an emphasis on presentation and unique flavor profiles, but the atmosphere is conversational. Rolls start at around \$10, and you should expect to pay about \$30 per person with drinks. The Hamachi (\$14) seduces the senses with a plume of savory-scented oils poured boiling hot right at your table. The Atún Jardinera (\$12.50) highlights the whole tuna delivered regularly from Ensenada. Wrapped in prosciutto and then seared, the raw fish is infused with

bacon-y savor (think pork

## **Scrumptious nuptials**

've been hearing about this marriage for three months now.

The marriage of the donut and the crois-

sant, that is. Happened back in May. By a Frenchman living in New York, natch. Dominique Ansel. Feathery croissant dough folded back and forth in layers and shaped like a donut. They say it's a sensation there, with lines forming

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outside every morning, starting at six o'clock.

Then they also put on all the crazy things people do put on donuts, like glazes and maple, and whipped cream, and bacon, even a splash of likker

Man, I'm shivering at the thought. Because, yes, I'm a fan of that super-flaky croissant dough — I never really have gone for the cakey dough you get in donuts. I'll put up with it to get that buzz from the icing, but love? No.

Carla, on the other hand, never met a donut she didn't adore. Irreconcilable differences!

But now comes hope: the Cronut. Best of both worlds. Could save the marriage.

Which is why I'm down here tramping along B Street at around 5:00 in the afternoon, looking for this new donut place I keep hearing about.

"Donut Bar."

Supposed to have gourmet donuts...and thar she blows just past Sixth Avenue, gold lettering on the window and a chalk-written list of the day's flavors on a sandwich-board menu at the entrance.

Except...there's a hand-painted sign scrawled in whitewash across the window glass. That one stops me in my tracks.

"Sold Out."

Dang!

I've heard that this little biz turns into the running of the bulls every morning, when the owner Santiago Campa opens his doors at 7:00. He sells *gourmet* donuts, the kind you happily pay three bucks for because they're handmade, twice the standard size, and often loaded with, like, Jim Beam Whisky or real cinnamon, or they're Vermont maple-syrup donuts wrapped in bacon,

or donuts tossed in genuine Saigon cinnamon. Donuts might be a kind of a no-no healthwise, but when these guys popped up and said to the passing

public, "You deserve to indulge yourself a little," it struck a note.

Guess I'll have to come earlier. According to the guy inside, Nik, they're often run out by 10:00 in the morning. "It's been like this ever since we opened at the end of

March," he says.

So next morning here I am again, this time right around 10:00 a.m. Crack o' dawn for me. B Street is fresh and buzzing with junior office staff out on errands for their bosses. And, yes, this time Donut Bar has donuts left. Don't see no Cronuts, though. Emily, one of the bakers, is bringing out a rack of bright-red-topped donuts. Huge. Looks like there's bright-green chunks of moon rock scattered across the raspberry glaze. Actual pistachios. "We call this Raspberry Pistachios," she says. Then she disappears into the back and returns with a rack of "Coconut Dreams."

Better act quick. I get that raspberry pistachio and the coconut dream. Three bucks each. Oh, and I see Vermont maple bars are going for a dollar. I get one of those, too. Plus one "buck-a-cup" coffee. Good price, and really good cawfee.

Problem is, there's no real place to sit down. It's pretty small in here. The counter and displays and ovens take up most of the room.

"Why don't you bring it upstairs?" says this guy. Turns out to be the owner, Santiago. "I've created a lounge up there. Comfy chairs, Wi-Fi, view of B Street, swing tables for your laptop. It's a great working space."

I go on up. Sink into a beautiful deep leather chair by the windows. Have to google "donut" on ye trusty iPad, because suddenly I want to find out about what I'm eating before I eat it. I mean, I get the "dough" part, but why "nut?" And why the hole?

Now I remember a stat a guy told me months ago down in that other donut Mecca, Stardust in I.B. Scott. He was a snowbird. "Americans munch



10 billion of these every year," he said.
"And the size of the donut hole changes with the economy."

Like, the bigger the hole in the economy, the bigger the hole in your donut.

Uh, let's give that idea a maybe.

His theory about how the hole happened in the first place? "It was a New England sea captain..."

Afterward, I checked out what he told me. Seems a Captain Hanson Crockett Gregory, around 1847, had a mom who made him up a package of big fat *olykoeks* — the Dutch pilgrims' "oily cakes" — to last the voyage on his sailing ship. Only trouble was, he couldn't steer and hold his oily cake at the same time. So he impaled it on one of the spokes of the steering wheel, and presto!, he had himself an instant donut-holder. He told the ship's cook to make them with holes from then on.

I like the story, but I have my doubts. There's another, likelier motivation for the hole: it helps the dough cook evenly all the way through. And the nut? That's just the chopped-out hole of dough that also gets fried.

So I'm reading and chewing and slurping, loving the pistachio donut, although it's the coconut one that wins the day. Strips of coconut flesh give it a kick of authenticity — this is *real* coconut, not just flavoring.

And the maple bar? I'll take that home.

Santiago comes upstairs to check on his customers. Says he's here till midnight most days with the baking crew, and back by 5:00 in the morning. "Not for wimps," he says. But he loves it that this is his ship. He used to work for big hospitality outfits,

like Four Seasons Hotels.

Have to ask: Do people object to paying \$3 for a donut?

"They cost \$3 because they're big,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  inches," he says. "And all the ingredients are high end. The maple-syrup donut wrapped in bacon? We don't use animal fat or beef lard. We sell only what we can make here. That's 2000 a day, max. Krispy Kreme does ten times that. That's why we have to stop when we run out."

Santiago says he's always here when the night shift ends and the day crew arrives. "We line the entrance as the night crew leaves, clap and cheer them all the way out. Because they're the unsung heroes."

And the Cronut? Next time I pass Donut Bar, it's late afternoon — I'm heading for the Fifth Avenue trolley station — and I see this guy inside cutting circles out of square chunks of dough on the flour-dusted counter behind the display cabinets. Have to ask what he's doing. Turns out he's from 7th Café, around the corner. Javier Jiménez. "Santiago and I are working together on this," he says. "It's our version of the Cronut. We're calling it the CroBar. The pastry's got eight folds in it, to make it feathery like a croissant. It's taken a lot to get it right."

They only make them when they have time. Then they bake them overnight. In the morning, the CroBars are usually the first to go.

Promised one of those suckers for Carla.

Means I'm going to have to get up even earlier.

Sigh. The things you do for love. ■

Indie takes a hit "Yeah. turnout was our lowest in a few years, actually," Alicia Champion reports to the Reader via email. Champion is the executive producer of the San Diego IndieFest. In 2010, IndieFest peaked in North Park, where security had to

that it's hard for a community event like IndieFest to compete with longstanding large-scale venues like Del Mar, for example."

IndieFest started in 2004. "The first event was at the Abbey in Banker's Hill. It drew about 500. Until this last year,

were thinner.

"I think a few things came into play, particularly moving the event to August this year. There's just so much going on in the San Diego summertime,

split between free admissions and hard ticket sales, such that in the final analysis, actual crowd numbers are estimated by the San Diego Police Department.

"I don't know that I'd call [this year's low attendance] so much a fluke, because in retrospect, I understand why certain things took place. Danielle [LoPresti, Champion's partner] and I weren't nearly as present as we've been in the past. We had to hire outside contractors to do a lot of what we normally handled ourselves, and the move from March to August clearly increased competition."

One wonders also if the future of live music is headed toward the YouTube graveyard or live streaming from clubs directly to iPads and iPhones. Are music fans just not leaving home?

"People are definitely leaving their homes for live music, but it is right to acknowledge the curveball that live streaming represents. I certainly don't have the answer to what the future holds, but I think that people will always treasure the experience of live music and that it will always have a market, however evolving it may be."

For Champion, what's the biggest lesson learned from this year's event?

"That producing IndieFest and fighting cancer in our home simultaneously is really, really hard and probably shouldn't be repeated." LoPresti, Champion says, is battling a particularly virulent and fast-growing type of the disease at present.

Sources close to the event say the producers took a financial hit this year. Will the future of live music in San Diego include another IndieFest?

"Yeah we took a hit. I don't think the actual figure is all that important for press. But if we're talking about coming back again next year, it's clearly something we think we can bounce back from."

Free puzzle. "When I was around 16 or 17, I walked into Lestat's to do my first open mic," says ragtime roots-rocker Nathan Fox. "I had recently finished writing my first song and wanted to play it for an audience. Well, not my first song, exactly. I had a ska band in high school and wrote songs with the other members of the group, but this was the first song that was written by me and for me." The song, "Dr. Marten," appears on Fox's I'm All Done EP, which drops this month.

The San Diego native's tunes like "Cutie Pie" (playable from his page in the Reader's Local Music Database) evoke Leon Redbone and Randy Newman, showcasing his acoustic cabaret bop with frequent touches of New Orleans swing. "Once I had all the songs written, I contacted my friend Jake Staley about coproducing the EP with me. Together, we wrote out charts for the players, preproduced mockups, click tracks, and scratch tracks in our own studio, and then flew out to Bomb Shelter Studios in Nashville."

The Tennessee locale enabled Fox to recruit guest players such as bassist Dave Roe (Johnny Cash, Chet

Atkins), banjo player Richard Bailey (Al Green, George Jones), and drummer Fred Eltringham (the Wallflowers, Shervl Crow).

"We hammered out the recording and mixing in nine days with an engineer named Andrija Tokic. That was that. Or at least as far as the music was concerned. Totally didn't think about the album cover and cover art until it was time to submit it to iTunes, Spotify, and so on. Oops!"

Fox contacted friends Whitney Pratt (photographer) and Christopher Murphy (graphic artist) to help out. "The music in the EP is very me. It's stuff I like to listen to. I wanted the artwork to be the same in that regard. It's basically a headshot on the front cover with hand-written lyrics and credit list in the jacket.



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

Funk mined from the best days of funk, meaning the music that was made during the '80s R&B revival days by the likes of alto saxist Maceo Parker and bigger horn-band acts like Cameo. Jelly Bread has wah-wah guitar and man-falsetto and the manner of drumming that can only be played by humans with rubber arms. This is a basic four-piece rhythm section with a Hammond B3 organ and when they call in the horn section, it gets real. But the band can junk all of that and go swampy with the Mofro and Tony Joe White sounds coming out of an electrified violin and a lap steel guitar, and that works too. Did I mention that there's an altrock flavor on too all of this strange foundation?

To the uninitiated, this may seem disjointed. But we're not talking about a band trying to find its way in public here. Jelly Bread set out to be this conflicted from the beginning, and that's why their no-limits approach to music works.

The band is from Reno and they've nailed some of the regional awards available to them: a Reno news rag voted their second album No Dress Code best album of 2012; they were named Best of Northern Nevada twice run-

ning. Jelly Bread is vocalist, guitarist, and lap steel player Dave Berry, drummer Cliff Porter, bassist Brady Carthen, and Eric Matlock on keys. These four have figured out how to take bluegrass-based harmonies and chump them up with organ-powered gospel and soul and make an enjoyable product fueled by infectious grooves that don't seem so patently red state vs. blue state after all. Other critics have said it, and I agree: Jelly Bread is a band that is



one hit record shy of a national career. Until then, enjoy them on the festival stages they tend to land on. The perfect band, in fact, for a rib cookoff.

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# **Border angels**

"Every day we don't have immigration reform, two people die."

t's always a relief when license plates with Saguaro cacti exodus east this time of year. Our roads thin out, like arteries purged of cholesterol. But Teatro Mascara Magica's staging a play all Zonies should see — and everyone else.

The first two scenes of Josephina Lopez's

Detained in the Desert are so unsubtle you wonder when the real play will arrive. "I'm a patriot, not a racist," spews Arizona's

hate-talk radio jock Lou Becker. He encourages callers to co-spew drivel about "illegals" on the air and do far worse at the border. He interviews Enrique (the role based on Enrique Morones, founder of the nonprofit Border Angels). Lou utters one verbal hate crime after another, then goes deaf when Enrique says, "Every day we don't have immigration reform, two people die."

Scene two: young Latinos in a convertible. Sandra and Will get lost not far from the Arizona border. They've been dating for six months but don't know their real names. The cop who stops them knows even less. Convinced they're "illegals" by looks alone, he demands her documents. Sandra lifts off: she's a native-born American and doesn't have to show any "stinking badges!" We next see her in an orange jumpsuit and a

prison cell.

In a brief talk before opening night curtain, director Bill Virchis defined "teatro" as a "theater of the people, of the mind" that presents "the relevant issues of the day" as in a "conversation." Detained also has similarities to "agitprop" —


the "agitation and propaganda" theater of the '60s, where X was stardust and golden, and Y mewling and puking evil.

Detained begins like agitprop. It presents a "what are these people" attitude, not a "who." Then the real play shows up, and the surface slips away. Lopez has a knack for making original impressions sprout in unexpected ways.

There's always more. Becker's radio station, for example, is KRZT 1070. Arizona's notorious anti-immigration law is SB 1070, which permits racial profiling based on how a person looks or "sounds."

When the cop stops Sandra, he sees a racial template. He never learns that she was born and raised in the San Fernando Valley; she has a college degree and doesn't even speak Spanish. To blend in with gringo classmates, she changed her name to "Sandy."

Will, it turns out, is Canadian. He didn't


bring his Visa. Fortunately the cop doesn't check. If he did, Will would be queuing up on the Arizona border at sundown, waiting to cross the Sonoran Desert in hotplate heat.

So, an "entitled" Latina and a hired-gun talk-

show host making gobs of loot from xenophobic rant. The cop racially profiles her. But just a sec: mightn't we have profiled the slice of fascist bacon behind the mic as well?

Lou has a backstory. And the desert where





he, like Sandra, becomes "detained," burns it out of him.

Since he became Artistic Director of the La Jolla Playhouse, Christopher Ashley has introduced one innovative program after another: Without Walls (a three-day festival begins October 3); and the Resident Theatre Program, which provides a one-year base for "up and coming" — and often "homeless" - companies, has earned national

This season's recipient, Teatro Mascara Magica, stages Detained with an 18-person cast. The opening night had some expected jitters, and the acting varied in quality, at first. But as the play grew, and the themes took over, so did the performances.

John Iacovelli's ingenious set facilitates the playwright's film-like approach. Somehow he suggests both walls (rusty, corrugated tin) and emptiness. At first, the covered lights overhead have a fiestalike quality, until you realize they're the white plastic, gallon jugs the Border Angels fill with water and leave at key points in the desert for the thirsty.

Skulls on the ground and two Dia de Los Muertos living skeletons creeping here and there combine realistic and mythical elements.

Though he starts a mite over-the-top, spreading hate with broad funhouse smears. Charles Maze runs an emotional gambit as the DJ Lou Becker — and a physical one, since he undergoes a searing, and believable, humiliation.

In her first scenes, Alix Mendoza was too tentative as Sandy. Mendoza hit stride once "Sandy" learned how it felt to be "Sandra." Dave Rivas - always a delight as "Cholo-Satan" in TMM's hugely popular Christmas show, La Pastorela - gives Enrique, the Border Angel, a well-deserved

If the playwright's name isn't familiar, her first full play might be: Real Women Have Curves, produced at the Rep in 1994. San Diego, in fact, is currently having an unofficial, Josefina Lopez Festival. Along with Detained in the Desert at La Jolla, beginning September 13, OnStage Playhouse will premiere Logan Heights. It's about a place that "isn't heaven, but it's my home." ■

Matthew Lickona: How did you pitch this film?

JS: A mom rescues a stripper and realizes that she's the one who needs rescuing.

ML: So Rachel (Kathryn Hahn) is the mom in that sentence, and McK-

enna (Juno Temple) is the stripper. Rachel strikes me as haunted. Is she? If so, by what?

JS: I think she's haunted by a lack of connection to her soul. Anxiety is sort of a version of soul death. Anxiety is like this thing: "I'm spinning in my head, trying to figure out what matters, and nothing matters. Nothing's landing. Motherhood isn't landing. Couplehood isn't landing. I'm spinning and I can't land myself." I do think that Rachel is searching. Bringing McKenna home is her just trying to reconnect to her body, looking for that connection between her heart and her womb.

ML: Can we talk about the mechanics of bringing McKenna into her home? Rachel approaches McK-

enna at the coffee cart and introduces herself as someone who got a lap dance from her. If a man ever went up to an off-duty stripper and said that, it would come off as kind of stalker-y.

JS: But because she's not a guy, it isn't. The diversion is, "I'm a mother. You're a kid. We're both women." A woman getting a lap dance can pretend

to be a man, but she can also experience that feeling of sameness. "We're not different."

We question the notion, "What do these women have in common? One's a Madonna, one's a whore. Do they still have a relationship with each other?" I think Rachel convinces herself of the mother-daughter thing as a reason for staying in contact.

ML: Why does McKenna play along? I mean, Rachel offers to pay her as a way to help her out of the sexworker life. But McKenna doesn't seem eager to leave the sex-worker life. Why does she accept Rachel's proposal?

JS: I think McKenna thinks she's helping Rachel a little bit. "This woman clearly needs something." And she has


nowhere to stay.

ML: But when she goes back to sex work, Rachel feels betrayed. Does McKenna get that?

JS: McKenna has just gotten a call from her mother, who's crazy and is a drug addict and needs money. She and Rachel are playing a game: "I'm mom and you're my college student who's come home." And McKenna says, "Fuck it. I'm not going to play this any more. I have to take care of my mom." To me, it's this feminist generational thing — the stay-at-home mom has the privilege. McKenna comes from the working class. She has to work for her

money. She doesn't really want Rachel's money. There's a divide.

ML: Sometimes there is a scene in a film that feels like the germ of the whole movie even if it doesn't sum up what the film is about. For me, the story Rachel tells when she gets drunk — about having sex her freshman year



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at college and then getting an abortion and dropping out — felt like that kind of scene.

JS: You know, I sometimes look at the whole movie as a parable of second- and third-generation feminism. When I was in college, I was a second-generation feminist. This was pre-sex-positive feminism. We demonstrated outside of porn stores. Sort of Ms. magazine, "I'm not an object," access to birth control, abortion rights. We were reading Andrea Dworkin, and it was a feminism that was very disconnected from our sexuality. We were just beginning to learn about sex-positive feminism, the Susie Brights and Nina Hartleys, the women who were saying, "Sex workers are people too." That was just beginning. I look at that time in my life...and the two things discussed in that scene are consent and abortion. This notion of having sex with somebody when you weren't sure you wanted to, not really being able to say no because you actually had no idea how to say yes.

ML: Rachel rejects the idea that she was raped.

JS: Right. She's like, "No! Nobody asks in college." It's college; people don't ask. You just find yourself — you know, you meet some guy, you're kissing, and "Oh God, it's in. He didn't ask. I didn't say yes. I didn't say no. We're doing it." Because you're 19, and you're not even really able to claim desire at 19. There was no place for desire in that feminist narrative. There was only sort of, "Don't look at me. Don't look at women." What's happening underneath in that scene is, she's talking about abortion — and this is going to sound incredibly cheesy — but at one point I realized, "Oh, McKenna is her

ML: Well, it's not so cheesy, given that she opens the conversation by

asking, "Does anyone wonder what their aborted children would have been like?"

JS: Right, and then we cut to McKenna and she's dancing with the men. And she's about the right age. I do think that in some ways, third-generation feminists are the daughters of second-generation feminists. We gave birth to them, with the pill and with Sex and the City and with Fuck-Me Feminism. Now there is a whole generation of women who consider themselves powerful and who like to wear five-inch heels and take pole-dancing classes. Whether they have it all or want it all or are forced to want it all, who knows?

ML: Speaking of sex: in my notes, I've got, "Rare to see married sex not played for laughs."

JS: I do feel like I'm good at sex scenes, and that, as a woman, I have a responsibility to write and shoot sex, because I can and I'm not scared of it. And so few women are directors, and so few people will say, "Let's walk into

the most uncomfortable moment, the sexual moment, and show what it feels like from a woman's point of view." I know how to shoot it and how to make it meaningful and funny and sexy. But I don't know whether I want that on my tombstone, like I was some sort of pornographer.

Many directors make the lucrative leap from art house to multiplex; few do so without a compromise of principles. Meet John Crowley.

Scott Marks: Thank you for interrupting your Sunday supper to speak with me.

John Crowley: Absolutely fine. It's a pleasure.

SM: In *Boy A*, you gave Andrew Garfield his first big break. Does Spider-Man still return your calls?

JC (laughing): Yes, he does. There isn't anything I'm knocking on his door for. I'll put it that way. He invited me along to the premier [of *Spider-Man*] here. He's a good guy. And he's not so bad as an actor, is he? He's promising.

SM: *Closed Circuit* is a film that I admire for what it doesn't do almost as much for what it does. It's a top-flight espionage thriller without spies, gunplay, or CGI wizardry, and the romantic leads don't kiss let alone screw. Was this a conscious decision on your part?

JC: Yes to all of it. I did set out to make an adult entertainment, as it were. I wanted it to be accessible, not 'art-housey' in any way. There aren't a huge number of interesting thrillers made since the '70s. In the '80s and '90s they began to feel more bloated and bigger and more expensive. And less interesting. We wanted to take the kind of approach Alan J. Pakula or Sidney Lumet used and see if it could be done in an English context. There hasn't really been anything of that sort here since *Defense of the Realm*, a really, really good film from the '80s. It was one of Gabriel Byrne's first big breaks.

In terms of the romantic relationship, there was a thread of that present in the very first draft. I liked it, but then in later drafts it went further and that just ripped something in the fabric of the film. What I liked about the challenge of the script as it was presented was that you look at these two people as sort of shards of a broken relationship. You meet them at their lowest ebb and gradually begin piecing it together. I'm much happier doing 1+1 and leaving it to the audience to fill in the 2. If there was an actual love-making scene thrown into the film, I thought that it would have violated something in the integrity of the trial. It would have felt gratuitous.

SM: The first shot in the film is of a bank of 15 surveillance monitors. Is it possible for one operator to pan and zoom all 15 cameras at once in order to follow the action or did you take a bit of artistic license?

JC: We took artistic license in the sense that we could only shoot with a maximum of three cameras simultane-

ously. We repeated action endlessly, but covering it from three angles at once before we built up the full montage of images. You can imagine from a continuity point-of-view it was very difficult to repeat all those takes with enough coverage in order for us to move around. All of those positions have to be incredibly specifically recorded up to exact angles. It was very complicated and took a lot of repetition.

SM: Your play *True Lines* won the Stewart Parker Award for Best New Play in 1995, yet to date, all of your films are written by others. Why is that?

JC: It was a "devised play," which is a way of working...I guess the closest correlative in cinema would be Mike Leigh. It was based on a huge number of improvisations and a script was distilled down out of that with the four actors that I worked with. It was a particular way of working that I loved at the time. It allowed you to go from a verbal scene into an image and then you would cut to something else. It was quite a cinematic way of working. That said, we rehearsed for seven weeks before coming near to the kind of script that we would then go ahead and put on a stage.

I haven't yet — which isn't to say that I won't one day — found a way of structuring that kind of process in the film world, which, as you know, tends to very much be about needing to see the script and knowing who is in it before anyone is going to give you \$100 let alone the millions needed to make a movie. We put [True Lines] on in the back room of a pub. We were free to do what we wanted. It was the glory of being unemployed that allowed me to be that bold, in a way. The film world is very structured and Mike Leigh is the only one I know of who is able to use that kind of an approach regularly. He then goes away and writes down the screenplays. It's not writing in the traditional way. That's something that I just don't have as a skill. You either have it or you don't. To work with very good writers is also a great joy.

SM: How much say do you have in casting?

JC: Oh, you know. Pretty much complete. Once your leads are attached, producers tend to leave me alone with it. They'll watch one or two auditions and say whether or not they like an actor, but it's pretty much my call. That's the way we did it on *Closed Circuit*. This is the biggest film I worked on. With the smaller films certainly that was the case. And I work with a great casting director [Fiona Weir], who also happens to be the mother of my two-year-old child.

Afternoon Delight — Writer-director Jill Soloway digs into the psyche of the happy homemaker's shadow self, the miserable mommy. (When all your needs are met, that's when you notice you're unhappy.) Rachel (Kathryn Hahn) is uninterested in her child, unmoved by her husband, and unconsoled by her friends. On a joyless lark, she accompanies her man to a strip club and has a close encounter with McKenna (Juno Temple), a full-service sex worker who seems comfortable in her skin. She winds up inviting McKenna to stay with her-sisters helping sisters and all that. In Rachel's own words, this is tantamount to throwing a bomb into the middle of her life. Even if the bomb ends the war, there are always casualties. Cleareyed characterization, unfettered dialogue, and crystalline performances help to keep the story from stagnating. 2013. — M.L. \*\* (LANDMARK HILLCREST)

Ain't Them Bodies Saints — A date movie for those who like their passion slow-burning and risky and their storytelling laconic and moody. Bob (Casey Affleck, whose voice and manner seem to hail from the Great Depression) is an outlaw who winds up in jail for a crime he didn't commit (plus maybe some he did). Why did he take the rap? For love. When his wife Ruth (a soulful and sad Rooney Mara) bears his child while he's locked up. Bob's longing to see them is such that he breaks out of jail and heads for home. Bob knows in his heart that love will conquer all. Some other folks have other ideas. Director David Lowery does a fine job of letting you know just as much as you need and no more, lest you mistake this for a crime drama instead of a love story with bullets. And it's a near thing deciding whether cinematographer Bradford Young or composer Daniel Hart does more to contribute to the pretty unprettiness of things. 2013. — M.L. ★★ (LANDMARK LA JOLLA VILLAGE)


**Blue Jasmine** — In *Annie Hall*, Woody Allen wrote a zingy throwaway line ridiculing a saliva dribbling, shopping bag-schlepping lunatic who wanders screaming into a

cafeteria. We mock the things we are to be. Thirty-six years (and just as many films) later finds him crafting an entire feature around a more upscale version of the babbling bedlamite. We join the ever-exceptional Cate Blanchett, a once wealthy socialite in mid-comeuppance, forced to move in with her working class sister (Sally Potter). Woody squanders much of his time paying cross-tribute to Tennessee Williams and John Cassavetes (A Streetcar Under the Influence?), resulting in a finished product that has little to show for itself save for a healthy contempt for rich Republicans. Character introductions are accompanied by five minutes of expository dialogue, and for a man with as many films to his credit as Allen, the filmmaker's ability to artlessly incorporate a flashback structure hasn't changed one iota since Take the Money and Run. 2013. — S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE — SEE SHOWTIMES)

**Bounty Killer** — A spiritless, secondhand ripoff of first rate social satire. It's Mad Max meets Death Proof to form the basis of another bloody dumb apocalypse comedy. With Corporate Wars having reduced the planet to near-unlivable conditions, a band of grubby futuristic human hunters are hired to beat the bushes-and anything else that gets in their way-in search of white collar criminals. TV graphic designer-turned-director/cowriter Henry Saine does wonders with a miniscule effects budget, giving his film its convincingly gritty futuristic look. But when it comes to telling a story that has something even remotely unfamiliar to say for itself, there should be a price placed on his head. 



In *Project X*, he played Miles Teller (!), college kid chasing high school skirt while getting wasted at a house party. In 21 & Over, he played a college dropout on a quest to get his old high school buddy blasted on his 21st birthday. Here, he's a failing high-schooler who's never without his flask, thanks mostly to his absent father. He hooks up with "nice girl" Aimee (a toopretty-for-the-part Shailene Woodley) and introduces her to the sauce. She takes to it like mother's milk (actually, Dad died from pills), and the two of them share a boozy interlude before reality comes crashing in. **The World's End** — The final chapter in Edgar Wright's Cornetto trilogy, and very much a raised-stakes version of the first entry, Shaun of the Dead, In Shaun, a town was taken over by zombies, and the hero was forced to confront his failings. In World's End, the world is threatened by aliens, and the hero is...yeah. Also: when you add all that supersized drama, something tends to get lost. There's something here about the dangers of nostalgia, and something about the awfulness of corporate sameness, and something about the value of stubborn individuality shining through a haze of drunken belligerence, but the film's chief pleasures come from the interaction of its five stars (Simon Pegg, Nick Frost, Martin Freeman, Paddv Considine, and Eddie Marsan), out to finish the twelve-pub crawl they bailed on back in the day. 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do that? You know we're going to see you. There's the cameras," gesturing toward the security cameras. Agent Strickland watched most of the reading from a white Border Patrol SUV parked about 40 feet away. He declined to comment on the incident, referring to a questions contact number on his business card at U.S. Customs and Border Protection.

Watman said that before the secondary wall was built, people used to hold hands and pass pizza through the old wall, which is made of large vertical metal beams with gaps of about six inches in between them. But now the Border Patrol policy is strict. Watman said they even got in trouble once when water was accidentally being squirted through the fence while creating a garden at the site. In addition

to working on that garden every Sunday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., he said the next big event will be on Saturday, September 21, California Coastal Cleanup Day, and involves general garden improvement.

#### In light of the cost...

#### **Traffic signal camera enforcement** discontinued

After a presentation by Escondido city staff last Wednesday, city council voted to let the city's contract with Redflex expire in December 2013 and terminate police enforcement of photo-recorded red light violations.

In 2003, the city entered into a five-year contract with Redflex, a traffic systems developer from Phoenix, Arizona, to lease equipment and provide support. Between 2004 and 2006, red light camera systems were installed at seven intersections around the city, four of which are on Valley Parkway. The contract was renewed for an additional five years in 2008 and will expire on December 12, 2013.

Since the camera systems were installed, accidents at those seven intersections were reduced by about 30 percent. However, dur-

ing the past five years, the city also improved safety at other intersections: left turn phases of lights were created, improved signal coordination achieved, retro-reflective backplates installed, etc. As a result, the accident rate reductions at Redflex red light intersections were not very different from accident rate reductions at other intersections city-wide.

Last year, the city paid Redflex about \$627,000 and raised only \$450,000 in ticket revenue with a net cost to the city of about \$177,000. Other safety improvements made by the city cost significantly less and provided at least as much additional safety for drivers. In light of the cost and lack of additional safety benefit, it was felt the program has essentially run its course.

Ending enforcement of violations generated by the red light cameras was supported by Police Chief Craig Carter. In his first appearance before the city council as police chief, Carter said, "If the council's direction is to terminate the contract at December 12, then I will be leading my staff to stop issuing citations immediately."

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

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
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
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#### LEAD STORY

 The National Security Agency is a "supercomputing powerhouse," wrote ProPublica.org in July, with "machines so powerful their speed is measured in thousands of trillions of operations per second" — but apparently it has no ability to bulk-search its own employees' official emails. Thus, ProPublica's Freedom of Information Act demand for a seemingly simple all-hands search was turned down in July with the NSA informing ProPublica that the best it could do would be to go one-by-one through the emails of each of the agency's 30,000 employees - which would be prohibitively expensive. (ProPublica reported that companywide searches are "common" for large corporations, which must respond to judicial subpoenas and provide information for their own internal investigations.)

#### **Redneck chronicles**

- (1) Police in York, PA, arrested both Karen Harrelson, 48, and Gregory Stambaugh, 57, in May because they could not figure out which one started the couple's knife fight — over which contestant (Candice or Kree) deserved to win this year's American Idol. They had apparently stabbed each other with the same knife. (2) Dewayne Eddy, 54, was charged in Yuba County,

CA, in May with beating his adult daughter with folding lawn chairs and a can of beans after discovering that a bolt was missing in the chicken coop in his yard.

(And, yes, patients normally remain conscious during the surgery.)

- Firefighters are not infrequently called on to extricate adventurous men from sex toys, but one "armor-plat(ed)" device, six inches in diameter, into which the 51-year-old German entrapped himself in July in Ibiza, Mallorca, was especially challenging, according to the Diario de Mallorca newspaper, and took two hours and a dose of anesthesia toward the end. The saw blade the emergency workers used wore out during the rescue and had to be replaced, along with two sets of batteries. The man was kept overnight at Can Misses hospital, but was otherwise okay. - Americans stage dog shows, and Middle-Easterners stage camel beauty contests, and in June, the annual German Holstein Show took over the city of Oldenburg, with the two-day event won by "Loh Nastygirl," topping bovine beauties from Germany, Luxembourg, and Austria. The event is also a showcase for the cow hairdressers, who trim cows' leg and belly hair (to better display their veins). Said one dresser,
