#### **Obama hounded in Miramar**

Not everyone was interested in his golf swing

Most media attention surrounding President Obama's recent weekend jaunt to San Diego focused on his two golf outings and local admirers out to catch a glimpse of the presidential foursome on the links. But a handful of protesters gathered outside Marine Corps Air Station Miramar (where Air Force One spends its time in San Diego) late Monday morning, October 12, hoping to send Obama off with a rebuke of the proposed Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) international trade deal.

Kali Gochmanosky, who has spent months organizing rallies calling on local congressional representatives to vote against a TPP negotiation provision called "fast-tracking," explained the concerns of the protesters assembled outside Miramar's east entrance.

"We're afraid of offshoring more jobs like [the North American Free Trade Agreement] did, that it's going to have a detrimental effect on the environment," says Gochmanosky. "We're concerned about a provision that allows companies to sue states or municipalities that enact laws that dip into their profit lines — proponents of labeling genetically modified food, for example, could face lawsuits from Monsanto on the grounds that labeling could hurt their sales. There are just an overwhelming number of things that could potentially raise concerns with this treaty.'

Despite a lengthy campaign targeting local Democrats Susan Davis and Scott Peters, both Congress members voted to give Obama sole authority to negotiate the trade deal, afterward sending it to Congress for only a simple up-or-down vote on approval, with no amendments allowed.

"We didn't want fast-tracking of the bill to pass," Gochmanosky continues. "We're  $\hat{\mathbf{x}}$  not happy that Susan Davis and Scott Peters voted to help it to pass — they were the only two Democratic representatives in Southern California to vote for fast-track."

While happy to get their message out to a handful of news crews that had gathered in hopes of spotting the presidential motorcade on its way out of town, the activists were  $\stackrel{\sim}{\mathbf{n}}$  in for a long wait and intermittent drizzle,

#### Lit fuse in Mission Valley

Plans for population boom involve old hotel **Regional planners in San Diego have placed** a bullseye on Mission Valley as the preferred location to absorb San Diego's forecasted population boom.

According to the San Diego Association of Governments' (SANDAG) 2050 Regional Growth Forecast, 700,000 people are expected to move to San Diego by the midcentury. Now, developers and land owners in Mission Valley are taking aim, pitching large mixed-use development projects to the city to get the wrecking ball moving.

The latest parcel to go up on the chopping block is the Town and Country hotel, owned by local hotel magnate Terry Brown of Atlas Hotels.

As reported by the Reader, national developer Lowe Enterprises Real Estate Group hired lobbyist Paul Robinson to begin greasing the wheels at city hall for redevelopment of the Town and Country, located just south of Fashion Valley Mall in Mission Valley.

On October 10, the City of San Diego's **Development Services Department notified** the public that Lowe Enterprises has submitted an application to change the current use from hotel to "mixed-use transit oriented development."

The proposal calls for tearing down the Town and Country hotel to reconfigure the site to make room for a smaller hotel, less convention space, and to add 840 residential units as well as several parking structures. Dorian Hargrove

#### **Lawrence Freeman** ordered to desist and refrain

But desist and refrain from what?

n June 16 of this year, the California Department of Business Oversight issued a desist and refrain order to Encinitas's Lawrence (Larry) Freeman and two of his many now-defunct companies, Yeshilkoy Insurance Services and Structured Marketing.

In peddling financial products, Freeman made "an untrue statement of material fact to investors," charged the department. Freeman boasted that his product was "a no-risk investment."

Freeman sold investment contracts to people who handed him millions of dollars, and he should have registered those contracts as securities, said the state. It was the second such offense for Freeman.

Gregg Giordano lost \$400,000 buying into Freeman's scheme. "What should [Freeman] desist and refrain from doing?" complains Giordano, who wants to see a criminal investigation.

He went to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the San Diego police, the federal Commodity Futures Trading Commission, the San Diego district attorney's office, the state attorney general, and the state Department of Insurance before getting what he calls "worthless actions" from the California Department of Business Oversight.

Beginning in 2007, Free-man took in millions of dollars. He was promising investors 36 percent a year — a return so high it should have been a scam tipoff. He told his victims that he needed their money so he could purchase discounted life-insurance policies of rich, elderly policyholders

not expected to live long. Initially, Freeman would pay the premiums.

He called these deals "senior life settlements," although they are a form of viatical settlement that is more realistically known as a "death bet" because the jackpot is small or nonexistent if the old person takes his time dying. For decades, anti-scam agencies such as the FBI and Securities and Exchange Commission have warned investors about death bets. Some con artists don't even buy viaticals with investor money — they simply pocket the money they raise.

In 2012, Giordano sued Freeman and some of his companies for fraud. The suit stated that Freeman promised to purchase viaticals, "but he was not in the business of purchasing and selling viatical products." Nor was he licensed to deal in viaticals, and he never had any intention to pay back Giordano's money, said the suit. Giordano won and got a judgment, but Freeman has not paid.



**S**an Diego investors got their "Dear John" letter on March 14, 2008. Freeman said he could not pay returns but would be able to resume the payments in five months. Eric Matz, who put in

\$100,000 and lost a fourth of it, says, "I was told he had a big lump sum of money [raised from investors]. He explained he had all this money and invested it in a company that went broke. He gambled everybody's money on a big return, and it didn't pay off." Matz realizes that Freeman had no investor authority to put the money into anything but viaticals.

As months passed without payments, investor indignation rose. "I was surprised the guy was walking around with both legs," says Matz. "If he had taken money from the wrong people, they would have taken

him out."

(And not to a fancy restaurant.)

Dr. Gene Muse of Oklahoma City lost \$912,000 investing with Freeman, and much of it was from his employees' pension fund cache. He sued Freeman and also got a judgment that Freeman has not paid. Muse's attorney, Shawn Fulkerson, deposed Freeman under oath. Freeman admitted that only some of Muse's money went into senior life settlements. Much went into Structured Marketing, a company he had set up. Freeman also revealed that he had put investors' money into a pen that supposedly could digitize handwriting and an unexplained adventure in the soap business. He tried to set up a hedge fund. He had his own bank. He had other companies such as CDO Capital.



reeman admitted under oath that he had done business with L. Donald Guess, a former Coronado dentist who had set up a taxshelter plan for doctors and dentists. In 2004, a federal judge froze more than \$500 million in assets owned by those professionals through Guess's Xelan opera-

tion. The Internal **Revenue Service** and FBI raided Guess's headquarters. The IRS thought Xelan was an abusive tax shelter. Guess entities

went into bankruptcy. Guess eventually won that case, but in 2010 he was sentenced to serve 18 months in federal prison for filing false income-tax returns. In 2012, after Guess had been released from prison, an appeals court ruled that he had concealed assets from his ex-wife.

In the deposition, Freeman glowingly called Guess his mentor. Freeman had made a deal to purchase "intellectual property" from Guess — basically, a marketing program to sell insurance products to health professionals. Freeman committed to pay Guess \$1.8 million but didn't pay all he owed, according to the deposition. Guess, while operating his tax shelter, had relationships with offshore tax havens Barbados and the British Virgin Islands.

ENCINITAS The ocean takes what it wants

#### Council approves sandreplenishment project

The Encinitas City Council voted unanimously on October 14 to approve a plan to try and control coastline damage from storms. The Army Corps of Engineers project would reduce bluff collapses by adding sand to the coastline between Beacon's Beach and Swami's.

The coming El Niño winter and the longterm threat of sea-level rise compound the risks of bluff failure — one area fell earlier this month — and the thinning of the beaches south of Beacon's, he explained. The goal is to put enough sand on the beach to soften the impact of tides and waves against the beach and bluffs.

Homeowners have found it increasingly difficult to get permission to shore up the bluffs with seawalls, as the California Coastal Commission increasingly frowns on the practice.

"Our seawall fell down and it was a full two years before we could get permission to get it fixed," Marian Frick said.

Though homeowners endorse the sand "nourishment" project, retired marine biologist Dennis Lees said there are problems with the proposal.

Studies conclude that "Beach replenishment is futile," he said. "Beach replenishment is the opposite of how the situation should be addressed." His greatest concern has to do with the 20-foot deep basins on the ocean and

The project, which has been in the works for 14 years, involves placing 320,000 cubic yards of sand in that area every 5 years for 50 years, according to city planners.

"Sand moves," said Matt Valario, of Dudek Environmental Consulting Services. "Sand never stays where you put it. Around here, sand tends to move southerly."

lagoon floors created by taking sand — toxic dead zones are created from the sand removal, he testified. "The bottoms become anaerobic," Lees said. "Pismo clams and lobsters disappeared after the last SANDAG project."

Lees also pointed out that the Army Corps did not consider what's called "managed retreat," or strategic retreat, among the six options it studied — including doing nothing. Managed retreat recognizes that the ocean takes what it wants; the strategy's focus is on making whole those whose investments are no longer sustainable and to plan for what will inevitably be lost.

#### CARLSBAD **Absolutely malled** New development eclipses Westfield renovations

In 2013, Westfield Carlsbad mall announced a long-delayed renovation of the Plaza Camino Real property. The plan was to raise the roof — literally, open up the center, orient the stores to outside entrances, and create a retail, entertainment, and dining complex that would be a "destination center."

According to some merchants, around the end of last year, to prepare for the remodel, many store owners either had their leases bought out or were not renewed, in order to clear the path for new construction and new stores. On most days, the mall was like a ghost town, absent of shoppers with every third or fourth store empty; a façade advertised a "coming soon" upgrade.

Earlier this year, Caruso Development proposed a 21-acre shopping center on Carlsbad's strawberry fields, just a few miles south from Westfield Carlsbad. The proposed strawberry-fields center, which was fast-tracked through the city council, is to be anchored by a Nordstrom and other high-end entertainment and retail merchants.

Westfield's senior marketing director, Adrienne Bergeron, told the Reader on October 15, "We are disappointed by the efforts of Caruso Affiliated and its supporters to fabricate stories about Westfield, and creating a 'straw man' so as to divert attention away from the legitimate concerns of the citizens of Carlsbad and North County."

Bergeron is referring to the initiative that pushed the development through without voter approval and avoided costly environmental review. Bergeron said Westfield testified at hearings, telling the council that "Caruso Affiliated has pursued this alternative as a tactic to evade proper environmental impact and other reviews simply to save on costs and increase its own profit."

But Westfield has not financed nor been involved with recent grassroots community

efforts to overturn the council's decision. (The registrar of voters is still certifying petition signatures, which would overturn the council's approval and allow the public to vote.)

What's next for Westfield Carlsbad? "Westfield Carlsbad's phase two commencement has been delayed to increase lease commitments, explore additional prospects/potential for the property, and allow sufficient time to complete work with city staff. We are taking a thoughtful, customercentric approach and exploring all options."

One customer, upon leaving the mall, said, "I wouldn't be surprised if they tore the whole thing down and built condos." KEN HARRISON

The women were gathered around a table. Their hands remained at their sides while their eyes indulged in lingering gazes at the arrangement of appetizers: cheeses, fruit, bread, and hot spanakopita bites, whose consistency of form broadcast their frozen origin. Eventually, one of the women — young, wispy — reached down, lightly secured a sliver of red pepper, waved it over some hummus, brought it to her lips and nibbled daintily, slowly, as though it would have been crass to be seen taking too large a bite.

There was only one person at this art-related function whom I had met before, but I didn't know her well. Not that it mattered, as she had already walked away, leaving me the task of trying to not appear awkward as I continued to stand there and appreciate the fact that I wasn't hungry. I wasn't in the mood to be scrutinized; the way these women watched — their eyes probing here and there, swiftly darting up and down — made me want to slink away and disappear behind the nearest tree trunk.

"I think Madonna's trying too hard to appear young," said the oldest among us. "Why can't she just age gracefully? It's embarrassing, really." I gave up on plotting my escape and turned my attention back to my fellow ladies. Two of them were now discussing their workout routines. One preferred yoga, but only the sweaty kind; the other was into CrossFit. They spoke about toning and looking good in their swimsuits, an ongoing concern, especially with this endless summer San Diego seems to be having. At the mention of

swimsuits, a third woman joined the fray. "I don't have the same bikini body I used to have," she said. "But you know what? I'm okay with how I look, because I've had children. I earned these stretch marks and sags!" The other women nodded in approval. But I disagreed.

"I don't think you have to *earn* feeling fine about yourself," I said. "It's a decision you can make at any time. It's ridiculous to think that we can't be happy with ourselves unless we've paid some kind of price."

The mother nodded in acquiescence. She turned the conversation to magazines and the unrealistic standard of beauty they present. We all agreed how terrible it is that companies make billions by convincing us it's impossible for us to be *really* happy unless we look like a Photoshopped version of ourselves, and then hawking products purported to help us achieve such a narrow and impossible definition of beauty.

The mother cited the statistic that girls are developing eating disorders by the time they're eight years old, and then she shared a story about her own daughter, who at four years old is already worried about her baby fat. There was much *tsk*ing and shaking of heads. "How are we supposed to instill confidence in our kids?"

I brought up the New

York artist Caroline Caldwell, who is credited for a new proverb making the rounds online: "In a society that profits from self-doubt, it is a rebellious act to like yourself."

**Sneetches and freaks** 

"We're all just a bunch of Sneetches," I said, referring my favorite Dr. Seuss story. "Eager to spend whatever we have for a star to put on our bellies because someone told us it would make all the other Sneetches like and accept us."

Heads were nodding, agreeable noises were being murmured, and two more women now felt comfortable enough to casually reach for a grape or a piece of cheese. The spanakopita remained untouched.

After a brief lull in the conversation, the mother brought up Madonna, because she'd recently read a news story that included pictures of the megastar musician. "She used to be so great, I absolutely loved her," she said. "But then she got too skinny and now she looks like a freak."

"I think she's trying too hard to appear young," said the oldest among us. "Why can't she just age gracefully? It's embarrassing, really."

As they continued, I learned there is a "right" way to age, and that the actress Helen Mirren is a good example. As though reciting a *Buzzfeed* article, the women began to list all the things no selfrespecting woman of a certain age should be caught dead wearing, from shades of lipstick to articles of clothing that included the short-shorts in which Madonna was spotted.

I attempted to crack a joke by saying, "Could you guys stop 'should-ing' all over the place? It's beginning to smell out here," but the one woman who seemed to hear me just stared blankly, as though considering something, before offering yet another suggestion: "UGG boots," she said. "They're barely passable if you're in college, but after that, they shouldn't exist in your closet." It was hard to argue with that.

They began listing conditions that determined whether or not a woman should be "allowed" to wear a given item. Are her legs smooth or is there visible cellulite? Is her belly flat or is there a pooch? Are her arms muscular or flabby? How old is she, and does she really look that age? Because if she looks younger than she is, she can get away with a little more. It was fatiguing.

These were the same women who, not ten minutes earlier, bemoaned a culture that failed to instill confidence in young girls. Now they were bashing Madonna for being "too skinny" and detailing, with frightening specificity, what any given woman should be able to wear based on her physical characteristics. I wondered if it made them feel better about themselves, all this "knowing what was right and proudly abiding by those rules."

I thought of the four-year-old who was already fussing over how she looked, and I could understand why. It's not enough for us to tell our children that they're okay just the way they are. If we really want the message to sink in, we need them to see that *everyone else is okay just the way they are too*. Instead of hearing Mommy say, "Madonna is too skinny, she looks like a freak," imagine if that child heard, "There's a woman doing her own thing — good for her." **(***@barbarellaf*)

My friend Lorraine has a golden soul. She's the type of person who surprises you with coffee deliveries at that exact hour of need, who sends supportive texts throughout the day, who drops off mountains of groceries when you are recovering from illness. There's a special place in heaven waiting for her, I am sure of it.

Yesterday she brought soups, and right at that hour when I needed a hot bowl of comfort. "Where did you buy this?"

I asked her as I sipped a savory spoonful of shrimp wonton soup (**\$5.89** for 22 ounces at Ralphs). It featured bok choy, scallion, nice sesame flavor, and firm shrimp. It was the kind of soup that brings comfort right down to your toes when you're not feeling your best. "Ralphs downtown

your best. "Ralphs downtown on Market and G Street; it has an awesome Asian section," said Lorraine. *Mental note: start shopping at the downtown Ralphs*. "I also like Bear Creek Country Kitchen dry soups [Walmart, **\$3.48** for a 9.3-ounce package that makes a half-gallon of soup]. And takeout from Souplantation — the chicken noodle is the best [**\$6.99** for a quart]."

I'd never heard such detailed opinions about soups. At least I'd certainly never formed any. I can whip up a mean chicken-noodle soup when my people need it. But some days I'm the one who needs it, and I'm not making it. In such cases, it's nice to run out — better yet, send my man out — to grab a pre-made store-bought option. And I began to think that Lorraine can't be my only friend with opinions on the matter. A few Facebook posts, emails, and texts later, and my new iPhone was a repository of soup information.

Friend Ella was another fan of soups from downtown Ralphs. "The miso soup is delicious. I like the crunch of the green onion. And the soup leaves a bit of salt on your lips and a citrusy tang with also a smoky quality. Three comforting flavors all at once [\$5.89 for 22 ounces]."

"I like Amy's Organic Thai Coconut soup," said Kelly. "Delicious plain, but also good when you add chicken to it and make it hearty [**\$3.99** for 14.1-ounce can at Smart & Final]."

"I use a brand of soup called Pacific Natural Foods," MaryAnn offered. "The Thai It was the kind of soup that

brings comfort right down

to your toes when you're not

feeling your best.

Sweet Potato is especially good. I dump it into a Crockpot with some chicken thighs and serve the slosh over couscous [**\$3.59** for 17 ounces at Sprouts]."

> "Vons has a good selection of fresh soups in their deli section," replied Cherie. "I like their Signature Cafe Fiesta Chicken Tortilla soup. It's not broth-based but tomato-y [**\$4.49** for 24 ounces]."

"The organic tomato soup from Costco is the bomb," exclaimed Sarah, who doesn't mind dating herself with '90s lingo. (Harry's Organic Creamy Tomato Basil Soup is **\$9.99** for two 30-ounce cartons at Costco.) "I usually buy it when there is a coupon for it. Serve it with toasted pretzel rolls with melted cheese on top. The kids love to dip the rolls in the soup. Our second favorite is the chicken noodle from Costco. With a little French bread for dipping...yum!" (Rotisserie Chicken Noodle Soup is **\$9.99** for 64 ounces at Costco.)

"I like the potato soup from Smart & Final," said Monica. "And the whole family likes it, which is an added bonus." (Harry's Loaded Baked Potato Soup is

**\$8.59** for two 30-ounce tubs at Smart & Final.) "I love three soups

from Trader Joe's," offered Nancy. "The Butternut Squash soup [\$2.99 for 32-ounce carton], the Organic Creamy Tomato soup [\$2.69 for 32-ounce carton], and the Garlic

Rice Noodle soup [**99¢** for a 2.85-ounce bowl]. Those are faves in our home."

Roisin also touted the Trader Joe's Creamy Tomato Soup. "The kids really like it. It's really creamy, and I love creamy soups. I have used it to make different dishes, so it is pretty versatile."

Sande favored its spicy cousin. "Trader Joe's Roasted Red Pepper," she said. "It has just a little kick to it. I prefer a bit of spice."

#### Google Is Just as Bad

Re: "Yelp Giveth, and Yelp Taketh Away," October 8 cover story

We too have been given the shakedown treatment by Yelp (I prefer not to mention the business I am in but it's like the pizza business, a couple of big players that dominate marketing and a bunch of independents struggling to be noticed). We had over 20 five-star reviews disappear. After numerous attempts to contact Yelp by phone and email for an explanation, our only responsive contact was from the sales department trying to sign us to a \$500-\$800 a month contract to advertise with Yelp.

When we asked about our reviews, the sales person said she had nothing to do with the reviews. However, she indicated we would definitely appear in a positive light and premium position if we signed up to advertise with Yelp. These premium spots was reserved for only two or three similar businesses in our market and we were one of the lucky ones for some unexplained reason. We refused this shakedown.

Google is just as bad, if not worse. The review process on Google+ is almost unusable, at least for the average consumer. So, when you see five or more Google+ positive reviews, chances are they were posted by a professional marketing firm paid some big bucks. (We receive many calls each week from Google affiliated firms offering us a "free Google verification" to keep us in a prime spot on the search engines that will only cost us \$1000-\$2000 a month.)

With Google they get you coming and going. You can advertise directly on Adwords or you can use one of the many firms licensed to promote you on Google (with a substantial portion of the fees going back to Google).

As marketing pros will tell you, Google and Yelp offer their services to the highest bidders and have no compunction in letting the little guy disappear. So much for the concept of the internet leveling the playing field. (See Wall Street Journal article on the pizza chains driving the independents into the ground). In Europe Google has been the subject of numerous monopoly practice investigations and legal proceedings. In the U.S. no one dare speak up for fear that these behemoths will fund a Super Pac and gang up on any legislator trying to rein them in.

It is also likely that the consumer is the real loser here with prices rising substantially to cover these marketing bills. We already see this with the major players in our business where prices often run double what we charge for the same service — and surprise, surprise, these dominant firms are owned by big Wall Street hedge funds who keep their profits offshore and their employees less than full time to eliminate benefit costs like healthcare and retirement savings. And, of course, everyone knows the big pizza chains, the dental chains, the evewear chains, and other high-marketingprofile merchants are usually the highest cost option.

Interestingly enough, despite Yelp's aggressive tactics reminiscence of the Mafia protection rackets, both CNN and CNBC have articles recently indicating that Yelp is on the ropes financially. This could mean even more dominance for Google, and even higher prices for a business that wants to be noticed.

city, is in danger of collapse. A contractor was set to demolish a 250-square-foot portion of concrete shell surrounding the cave, allowing the pieces to fall inward and render it uninhabitable.

"[The inhabitants] will have time to gather their things — the law requires it," said Conrad Wear, aide to District 2 San Diego city councilmember Lorie Zapf. "Police will ensure a safe departure."

The cave sits high on a bluff beneath the Sunset Towers condos at 4909 Orchard Avenue. The bluff is reinforced with a five-inch shell of

concrete, a rarity on the bluffs and a type of reinforcement no longer permitted. It's believed the concrete was poured in the early 1980s — probably by the adjacent condo association — but there are no records to verify it, said Mike Fakhoury of the city's Public Works Department. Apparently, a chunk of the shell, also called shotcrete, collapsed, which allowed inhabitants to enter and excavate a larger shelter in the bluff, Fakhoury said.

Orchard Avenue residents have been increasingly vocal at recent meetings of the Ocean Beach Town Council, alleging the cave has been a staging area for drug activ-

ity, laundry theft, aggressive panhandling, and weapons possession.

A recent look inside the cave revealed ordinary items: mattresses, bedding, a hammock, a stuffed animal, clothing, cigarette butts, votive candles, and two empty minibottles, one containing olive oil extract, the other coffee liqueur.

The work was expected to be complete in a few days and cost an estimated \$35,000 to the city, Fakhoury said.

#### VISTA Yield or Stop sign? "What about speed-bumps?"

After years of watching cars speed through the intersection by her Vista home, Betty Haver got her traffic sign on October 13.

After much discussion, the Vista City Council voted unanimously to place "Yield" signs on east and westbound traffic. The 97-year-old, who has lived in Vista since 1976, says the traffic on Warmlands and Calle Sinaloa streets has increased and drivers can't see each other.

"Several years ago, I wrote requesting that the town of Vista install a stop or yield sign," she wrote. "Today again we had a close call with a car speeding through on Warmlands Street without hesitation. Please do something about this hazard."

But across the street, Mary Kelleher had different ideas.

"Currently, there is no problem with traffic on Calle Sinaloa. The problem may be with the new residents who are using Warmlands — they do not slow down or use any caution when exiting or entering the dead end of Warmlands," she wrote to the council. While she wanted to see traffic slow down, she didn't think a stop sign was suitable.

"What about speed-bumps?" Kelleher asked.

Vista traffic engineers looked at the intersection and found traffic was pretty light. And there have been no accidents in the past three years. But they could see where drivers on eastbound Calle Sinaloa have a huge blind spot because of the angles of the intersection. That alone qualifies it for a stop sign, according to traffic engineer Sam Hasenin.

"The geometry of the intersection is kind of skewed," he said. "[A stop sign] guarantees that a vehicle eastbound will not just proceed through the intersection." If you're stopping eastbound, then you stop the westbound traffic, too, he noted. But the oddness of placing a stop sign to hinder through-traffic in favor of traffic from a dead-end street was troubling to some council members.

"I would do a four-way stop," mayor Judy Ritter said.

Councilman Cody Campbell saw it differently. "We don't want to change it up so much that it becomes an inconvenience for local residents," he said.

# The Union-Tribune's favorite Cop

It was a last hurrah of sorts for two San Diego institutions, the late Bill Kolender and his onetime employer, the *San Diego Union-Tribune.* 

"Almost nobody didn't love Bill Kolender," said the U-T's October 6 editorial of farewell. "Unless, perhaps, you were a crook or a political opponent who got creamed by him in an election."

Though unacknowledged, the paper's tribute to Kolender was also an homage to its once-powerful self.

Kolender, who died October 6 at 80 after years of suffering from Alzheimer's, didn't live quite long enough to witness the final fall of the formerly mighty *U*-*T*, but his own power arc was parallel.

He started life on the force in July 1956, when **Richard Nixon** was vice president, Nixon's pal **Jim Copley** ran the *Union* and *Tribune*, and San Diego was the exclusive financial bailiwick of **C**· **Arnholt Smith**, Nixon's political patron, who commanded a financial empire including the United States National Bank, National Steel & Shipbuilding, a tuna fleet, and the Padres.

Kolender walked the beat during that era, witnessing the ways of San Diego law enforcement in the days of backroom gratuities, long before cops wore video cameras.

As he rose in the department and the city's politics, he got to know **Johnny Alessio**, Smith's protégé who ran the Caliente race track across the border in Tijuana.

ley was running the *U-T*, and Wilson was her candidate. She hoped, as her husband had done for Nixon, to build him into a national contender.

Tall, affable, and with a direct line to Wilson, the self-styled liberal Republican Kolender projected the progressive image of a clean San Diego that the mayor, who coveted higher office, wanted to present to America.

Reality did not always match.

When Wilson moved on to the United States Senate in 1982, Kolender wanted to succeed him as mayor. A 1986 suit against the city by an ex-cop alleged that police intelligence honcho **Bill Moller** served as Kolender's undercover wingman.

"They came to me, and they said — it was Moller — and he says, 'You have got so much knowledge of who participates in massage parlors. You know our chief is thinking of running for mayor?" testified **Robert Hannibal**.

"And I says, 'Yeah.' He says, 'Well, we're trying to find some dirt on [**Roger**] **Hedgecock**. Didn't he frequent the massage parlors?' And I says, 'No, I don't have any information.' And he says, 'Are you positive?' And I says, 'Yes, I'm positive, at least I don't recall.""

"Last year, San Diego police officials dismissed more than 15,000 parking citations worth about \$250,000," the paper reported.

"A month-long investigation by the Times revealed that the Police Department routinely violates its own policies by dismissing thousands of tickets for flimsy or fabricated excuses or none at all."

Added the report, "The Police Department has dismissed tickets for Police Chief Bill Kolender's wife and son; Asst. Police Chief Bob Burgreen's daughter and some of Kolender's friends, among them KSDO radio sportscaster Ron Reina."

Caught red-handed, Kolender told the paper, "We're going to tighten up the policy. It will not be so easy to cancel a ticket in

Kolender drew a hand-slap from then-city manager John Lockwood, who held that only a reprimand, not a fine or dismissal, was appropriate in light of the chief's behavior, which also included Kolender's use of policewoman Jeanne Taylor to drive his children to dental appointments and for other personal errands, accepting free Chargers season tickets, and V.I.P. gun transfers.

Predicted Lockwood: "When Chief Kolender passes away or retires, you know what they're going to write? 'Chief Kolender, who was publicly reprimanded in 1986 by the city manager for accepting gifts....' They're going to be writing that forever."

In August 1988, Kolender stepped down as chief to go to work for Helen Copley at the Union-Tribune. The decline in newspapers had already started, but U-T staffers were threatening to strike for higher wages and better working conditions. The story added, "Gandelman says he told Kolender that the Rolodex had been privately purchased. Kolender told a television reporter that he thought Gandelman said the Rolodex belonged to the company."

The next day, two Copley editors called Gandelman to say his Rolodex would be "returned immediately and that he can do with it as he wishes," the *Times* reported.

Besides handling rowdy reporters, Kolender was paid big money to keep an eye on **David Copley**, the publisher's son, who was leading an out-of-control life of drinking and related debauchery at Foxhole, his luxury residential complex in La Jolla.

Copley had been repeatedly arrested for driving under the influence, landing him in a county work camp for a series of weekends.

It was said that Kolender, a hard partier himself, was intended by Helen Copley to become the father figure that David, conceived out of wedlock by Helen and adopted at age 13 by her second husband Jim Copley, never had.

With backing from Copley and her friends in San Diego's GOP establishment, Kolender was elected sheriff in June 1994, beating conservative Republican incumbent **Jim Roache**.

Kolender's long goodbye to San Diego began when he resigned during his fifth term in April 2009, clearing the way for hand-picked successor and big-money establishment favorite **Bill Gore** to be appointed sheriff by the county board of supervisors, as urged by the Union-Tribune.

# THE **MOBSTER'S** NEPHEW

One conjecture about why people are so fascinated by organized crime figures attributes it to a timid envy of those who flout the law so boldly.

But after selling his book at a four-hour signing stint at the Mob Museum in Las Vegas, Joe Bonpensiero concludes that it's much simpler. The book is called Niputi, The Nephew: Life under the Shadow of a Mafia Killer (selfpublished at CreateSpace Independent Publishing Platform, 2014).

"People just want to know what those guys were like in person," the author tells me by phone from the new home he recently purchased in Las Vegas. And Bonpensiero can share a few tidbits: he watched his mother host two of the most infamous mobsters in her home. "They were perfect gentlemen, very polite," he says.

The word niputi means "nephew" in Sicilian, and Bonpensiero, now 75, is the nephew of the book's title. The mafia killer is his uncle, Frank Bompensiero, so notorious that his name was used for a character in *The* Sopranos television series. "When I was still living

at home during my senior year in college," Bonpensiero continues, "Uncle Frank asked if we could put up a man and his son.

They stayed for three days. After they left, my mother recognized the older guy's picture on a TV news show. 'That man was in my house,' she said rather naively. The man was Joe Bonanno."

Bonanno had been the leader of one of New York's crime families dating to the 1930s. But in his later life he moved to Tucson. Who knows what connection he had with Uncle Frank? But Bonanno had gone on the lam several times as law enforcement pursued him.

In Niputi, Bonpensiero writes that he was eight in San Diego's Little Italy when his mother also hosted two guests for Uncle Frank. One was Frank DeSimone, later to head up the Los Angeles crime family. The author uses the word "erudite" to describe DeSimone and remembers him as extremely kind to the hostess, complimenting her profusely on her cooking.

But obviously not all

mobsters belong to the gallant type. The book contrasts DeSimone's civility with the dismissive air that Uncle Frank displayed toward the lady of the house. In preparation for the dinner that night, he ordered her around like she was a personal slave and was irritated by her explaining how she thought the dinner should go. "I rarely observed Uncle Frank being respectful to women, save for his wife Thelma, and his only child, Mary Ann," writes Bonpensiero. "Frank was not into anyone who disagreed with him, especially women."

In *Niputi*, this trait is one of several that characterized a man always wanting others to see him as the big shot, despite his never being able to rise into the crime leadership roles he craved. "The Bomp" was sure the fancy dinner in Little Italy would be a celebration of his appointment to the role of San Diego capo. Instead, he learned that the second guest that evening, Girolomo "Momo" Adamo, would soon be moving from Los Angeles to San Diego. Uncle Frank immediately realized that he was to become a foot soldier to the other man, taking on the dirty work, including "hitting" the organization's enemies.

The slight spelling difference between the author's name and that of the Bomp resulted from a birth-certificate misspelling of Uncle Frank's brother's last name. The midwife who made the mistake was not the only one who had trouble with the serpentine name. During the author's career in the Air Force, his commanding officer often called Bonpensiero "Bomb Dispenser."

Sammy Bonpensiero, Frank's younger brother, stayed clear of organized crime throughout his life, unless one counts financial and other support he often

gave his sibling during hard times out of the Sicilian sense of family obligation. Sammy's son, Joe, the writer of *Niputi*, always understood the nature of the obligation but chafed at how it kept an inveterate criminal's life uncomfortably close.

*Niputi* is a book that chronicles how Sammy, his wife Mandy, and his son Joey coped with *A Bad*, *Bad Boy*. The phrase is the title of another book by the late Judith Moore that first appeared in installments during the early 2000s in these pages. Bonpensiero admires the extensive research Moore did for her stories but complains that she became too close to Frank's daughter Mary Ann and accepted her viewpoint uncritically.

The author of *Niputi* maintains that Mary Ann's father kept her too protectively in the dark for her to be a trustworthy witness. As a result, according to Bonpensiero, Moore's book ends up romanticizing the mafioso, granting him great sympathy based on how much she loved him and how well she felt he treated her. "The book sparkled," writes Bonpensiero, "like a Tom Sawyerish takeoff on fun times on the Mississippi."

A key passage in *A Bad*, *Bad Boy* is illuminating.

"I believe," wrote Moore, "that [Frank] Bompensiero understood himself as a soldier in an army. I believe that he killed in precisely the same way that soldiers kill. He did not kill civilians; he killed other soldiers.... He had no skills, really. He couldn't even shoot straight. He fit himself into circumstances as best he knew how. Often, the fit was awkward. But he fed his family."

Moore then asked whether the Bomp ever felt remorse. A friend of his in later life "snorted," she wrote, when she asked him. "Frank said that if God hadn't wanted 'em dead," the man said, "He would have stopped the bullets." Moore added that she thought Bompensiero "intended no irony."

"I am not here to judge Bompensiero. We are judged even as we attempt to judge. If your Bompen-

siero is a thoughtless idridden thrill killer, an idle rip-off artist, a vicious extortionist, well, then, we know something about you and rather less than but no more about Bompensiero."

A little closer to home, Joe Bonpensiero is willing, in *Niputi*, to follow this line of reasoning — to a degree. At a time when he learned the FBI cleared him during a background check for his ROTC application to become an officer in the Air Force, he had been worrying about tickets he thought the San Diego Police Department had given him. He reports appreciatively a comment his father Sammy

made at the time. "All mankind would fail the test," Sammy tells him. "Deep down, everyone has something to hide, especially when you're trying to protect those you care about. You do whatever it takes."

But parking tickets pale in contrast to the life Uncle Frank led. So the author of *Niputi* shows the Bomp no mercy. Throughout the book, in a number of references, he refers to his uncle as "carrying an evil trait." The trait is presented as an inheritance from Frank's grandfather, who never left Sicily, where once in a fit of rage, he killed his own son. The man's "evil nature, the ugly head of hubris would infect some future offspring — and it did." Uncle Frank was "a family's evil seed gone awry."

In the Epilogue to Niputi, Bonpensiero writes: "I have considered that there could possibly be a bad gene within a baby that ekes along happily growing undisturbed. Then as it matures, it awakens and presses men into criminal attacks on

each other. Maybe one day, modern medicine researchers will find it."

If we wonder why readers are fascinated by organized-crime figures, should we not also ask Joe Bonpensiero why he wanted to write *Niputi*? In light of *A Bad, Bad Boy*, he says by phone, "I wanted to set the record straight. I had no illusions about making money. That's why I didn't want to fool with a publishing house editor, which could have taken a long time. I only wanted to get the story out."

The effort is not Bonpensiero's first foray into writing. He has already published *Chocolate Moon* (2006), a book about his experiences at sea on his father's tuna boat.

Maybe in hindsight the reason for writing Niputi seems plausible. But the book's 436 pages suggest an even more significant motive. In many ways, it is a story of revenge. Uncle Frank caused Bonpensiero's family and many other people who were able to continue living plenty of trouble. In the FBI's estimation, he also killed 22 people. He did know toward the end of his life, that he, the hit man, would soon be hit, too. But his 1977 killing coming out of a phone booth in Pacific Beach put an immediate end to whatever fear and regret he may have begun to feel.

Before Frank's death, however, his nephew appears to have punished Uncle Frank in a more appropriate and painful way. And he wants the readers of Niputi to know it. It was the time after Frank had been sent to San Quentin for forging a bribery check. He had been sentenced to 42 years but served only 5, getting out in 1960. Sammy, the niputi's father, had a hard time then trying to find something for his brother to do that wouldn't get

him in more trouble. The police were watching him like a hawk.

During the post-prison years, writes Bonpensiero, "there was a certain cadre of groupies, who, if you will, uplifted [Frank's] spirits and did the homage thing for him. On a bi-weekly basis, they met for lunch at Johnny Tarantino's Restaurant in Point Loma. Frank would in effect hold court there. He'd have his favorite lunch of fresh crab drizzled in olive oil with fresh lemons and minced parsley garnish on top and a sprinkle of sea salt and pepper.

"With his small entourage, he would tell tall tales of the old days in the mob to a contingent of wannabes who sat in awe of the aging walrus."

But did Frank name names? "I'd bet that he would never openly discuss any of his connections or affiliations with anyone. That was not Frank. He just allowed people to assume...." Bonpensiero was able to observe much of the fawning because his father assigned him to chauffeur Uncle Frank around town. He would have to do it only when Frank "needs to get out." When on the town, Frank sought recognition. According to Bonpensiero, Uncle Frank had a great need "to inflate himself."

Bonpensiero hated role of chauffeur but obeyed out of filial duty. He was in college and had a girlfriend named Gracie he'd dated off and on for several years. On one of his nights off from driving, he and Gracie ran into Uncle Frank in a nightclub. Frank invited them to join him at his table, where he situated himself next to Gracie, ogling her conspicuously. "The next day," writes Bonpensiero, "Frank called and asked me if I would consider giving him Gracie's phone number. I almost fell on the floor. He was about 55 at the time and was trying to hit on my 20-year-old girlfriend."
Bonpensiero writes that he pointed out how young Gracie was and offered to set up Frank with one of her friends instead. "Just so you know, Joey, they all are going to be younger," Uncle Frank replies. "But who gives a shit? They all go down the same way. Right?"

"I was no prude," continues Bonpensiero, "but listening to him disgusted me." He and Gracie then planned an evening together with Frank. They came up with a tall, gorgeous blond who worked as a stripper. When Frank got the news, he borrowed a brand new red Cadillac for his nephew to chauffeur the four of them around for an evening. But as Joey came back after taking Gracie to her door when the night was over, he heard Frank's girl giving him bad news. As he pawed her in the back seat, she told him she wasn't "straight" and got out to go to her own car. In the driver's seat again, Joey listened to his uncle berate the girl. "I don't go out with perverts or lizards that change their f\*\*\*ing stripes." Writes Bonpensiero, "We left it at that. We had a funny at Frank's expense."

The funny may have emboldened the *niputi*. Not long afterward, he finished his "baby sitting" sessions with Uncle Frank. But they were soon to meet again. The occasion was an engagement party for one of Frank's nieces, a cousin to Joey. The girl's mother noticed her daughter drinking too much at the instigation of her fiancé. Mother wanted Frank, the eldest relative, to intervene.

Frank went into the room where the drinking was going on and noticed Joey sitting in a corner. He confronted his nephew about not stopping the situation. It took only seconds for a heated confrontation to develop, and Frank asked Joey to step outside. In the Sicilian culture, writes Bonpensiero, "The younger individuals, by custom with its implied threat, would not, could not, and dare not contradict an elder relative."

But outside, when

Uncle Frank grabbed Joey by the shoulder, a fight was on. "In retrospect, I had just about all I could stand of my uncle," writes Bonpensiero. "Over the last few months, I had squired him around and paid for the privilege with

the hard earned money Dad earned. I had been embarrassed by his crude and pompous actions in public and had endured his crass fawning over my girl."

Joe struck quickly. "After faking toward my left, I swung upward and shoved my fist into the side of his face and heard the sound of a crunch."

Frank swung back and missed, whereupon Joe hit him again several times on the cheek and eve and in the midsection. Now Frank was on the ground with his nephew on top of him delivering "a barrage of punches with all the fury that 20 years could unleash."

Joe felt his Dad pulling him off with shouts to stop

and a reminder that "he's vour uncle."

"No, he's your brother. I don't have an uncle."

Frank and his nephew would collide one more time. The mobster and an accomplice named Jimmy "the Weasel" Fratianno were trying to extort profits from Nate Rosenberg, a successful local businessman. They had gone to such an extreme as to hang him by his ankles out of a fourth-floor window in a room of the US Grant Hotel. Of course, they had to pull Rosenberg back in or he'd have fallen to his death without turning over any money. But Rosenberg was so terrified that he agreed to have the men later come to his business, where he promised to cough up the first round of the cuts they wanted.

However, writes Bonpensiero, he was called in to knew his father from their earlier having businesses near each other on lower Broadway. Rosenberg asked Sam Bonpensiero for a recommendation of someone who could help him counter his brother. Sam recommended his son Joe, who by now was already back home after serving his first tour in the Air Force.

thwart the plan. Rosenberg

By the time the mobsters showed up for their first installment, Joe Bonpensiero had taken a job in Rosenberg's company. While Rosenberg was further discussing the deal with the thugs in his office, his secretary alerted Joe, who suddenly entered carrying a tape recorder. He told the mobsters he was prepared to bring the district attorney down on them. Then he turned to Fratianno: "Jimmy, has he told you that when he

tried to play tough guy with me six years ago, I almost broke his jaw, gave him a big shiner and kicked him in the ribs a few times?"

The crooks got up and left, never to return. It was 1968. By this time, Uncle Frank had already been a modestly paid informant to the FBI for two years. After later speaking with FBI agent Jack Armstrong, Bonpensiero writes in an email, he estimated that Uncle Frank ratted out hundreds of mobsters over the course of the rest of his life. Yes, he did take the hit in 1977 that he knew was coming his way. He could not have felt the bullet that entered his skull from behind his ear. But earlier, the man who had such a strong need to inflate himself must surely have felt the humiliation his nephew Joey had twice meted out to him.

Fulkerson asked Freeman if he was running a Ponzi scheme. There was no reply. The lawyer also attempted to quiz Freeman about his tax payments. After consulting with his lawyer, Freeman took the Fifth Amendment on any tax subject.

I asked Fulkerson what Freeman and Guess planned to do with investors' money. "They never had any intentions [of] paying people back. It is alarming that these folks are not behind bars," he says.



**B**ut Freeman has pulled a slick delaying tactic. One of his investors convinced others that good ol' Larry will pay them back.

For seven years, Freeman has been running his Noteupdate.com website. Regularly, he posts information on what he is doing to get investors' money back. He complains about "technical difficulties" and enthuses about a "promising day," but he never comes up with money. He tells investors not to contact him.

Freeman did not answer phone calls, so I sent him an email, asking such questions as whether he is running a Ponzi scheme, why he is taking the Fifth Amendment, and whether he has been doing offshore banking. His answer: he is a victim of the Great Recession of 2007-2009. Quoth he, "My enterprises, financed with personal and borrowed funds, were counted among the casualties of that downturn." He did not address the specific questions.

I couldn't find out if investors believed him, because I couldn't get them to call me back.

The U-T and the Times are working together as the Southern California wing of Tribune Publishing.

**On September 8, Austin** Beutner, publisher of both the Times and Union-Tribune, was fired by Tribune Publishing, which on September 18 lashed out at Beutner's performance in its flagship Chicago Tribune publication. In that article, the Tribune **Publishing chief financial** officer lowered revenue estimates for the year and blamed sub-par performance in Southern California.

The October 14 New York Times story included email exchanges within Tribune **Publishing almost certainly** leaked by the Southern California wing of the company.

The Tribune Publishing chief financial officer had written in an email September 17, the day before the announcement, that she had "reviewed the forecast reports and believe there is risk in the San Diego numbers. Please take ad revenues in San Diego down \$3.5 million, and rerun numbers." After the announced

reduced forecast, Russ Newton, president and chief operating officer of the U-T. continued on page 38

wrote Chicago headquarters and expressed surprise at the reduced forecast. "The projection does not seem realistic.... No one on my team appears to be the source of that decision," Newton wrote, according to the *Times*, which said it could not get confirmation from Newton.

Later, Newton provided numbers to the Chicago headquarters and wrote another email stating, "I was somewhat confused by the request to reduce our San Diego [revenue] forecast by \$3.5 million for the balance of the year." The *U-T* said in the worst-case scenario it would have to reduce the forecast by \$821,000.

Tribune Publishing conducted "no rigorous financial review" in dropping the revenue forecast, wrote the *New York Times*.

#### Papa Doug's veil of cash and influence

Manchester still stiffing Texas creditor

Douglas Manchester, San Diego's rich Republican kingpin, can't manage to dodge one persistent creditor, who has chased the La Jolla real estate mogul from Texas to San Diego with a legal cleaver that gets sharper with every courthouse move.

As first reported here back in July 2013, Manchester in January 2008 set out to establish a new La Jolla institution to be called Manchester Financial Bank.

Frederick J. Mandelbaum, a past member of the Housing and Community Development Advisory Committee for the County of San Diego, was retained to run the operation. Fay Avenue offices in La Jolla were leased, a bevy of lawyers was hired, and an Austin, Texas, outfit by the name of 21st Century Financial Services was contracted to provide computer help.

Then the market crashed, and on October 3, 2008, Manchester — who prefers to be known as "Papa Doug" — called the whole thing off, "based on the current financial turmoil," Mandelbaum said in an email to 21st Century.

On April 2, 2009, attorney S. Alan Rosen fired off an email to Manchester regarding the delay in compensation for work done.

"Papa Doug," Rosen began. "For the last few months I've been communicating with Dick regarding payment of our final invoices for the work we did on the Bank."

Continued Rosen, "Although I understand and appreciate the decision to abandon the project, payment of our fees was not contingent on 'success' or opening of the Bank. Enough time has elapsed that I am now prepared to initiate legal process, although I've tried very hard to avoid that for everyone's benefit."

Said Rosen, "The balance due is \$20,205. I've offered a compromise of \$17,500 to settle, but I'd expect payment promptly, as the deadline was March 31st."

Less than an hour later, Manchester emailed Richard Gibbons, Manchester Financial's CEO, regarding Rosen's message, saying, "Simply pay him \$17.5."

But 21st Century remained stiffed, and subsequently brought a federal court case after an arbitrator ruled in favor of the data services company in February 2010 to the tune of \$477,070.39.

Federal judge Lee Yeakel sustained the award in March 2013; the protobank, still using Manchester Financial's money, according to court filings, launched an appeal.

Manchester lost again in March of last year when the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals rejected its plea and upheld the judgement.

Thus began 21st Century's relentless cross-country collection quest, targeted directly at Manchester.

"Mr. Manchester was an organizer of the Bank, Chairman of the Board of the Bank, and proposed 96 percent shareholder of the Bank," says the computer firm's September court filing, portraying Manchester's seemingly casual way of doing multimillion-dollar business. "The fact that Mr. Man-

chester 'volunteered and committed' to pay the Bank's pre-opening expenses without any documentation, plan for repayment, or classification of the money transfer as a loan or otherwise, evidences Manchester Bank and Manchester Group's failure to maintain an arm's length relationship."

Contends the document, "the evidence revealed in post-judgment discovery overwhelmingly supports piercing the corporate veil to reach Manchester Group's assets."

More answers to Manchester's many other money mysteries may come October 30 with another hearing in the case before federal judge Barry Moskowitz.

with minimal legal training, who has almost unlimited discretion to "make findings of fact and reach conclusions of law and mete out a sanction," while refusing to consider evidence offered by the accused.

To an imperfect driver who has suffered through "reexamination" under California Vehicle Code 13800, these procedures detailed by Dorian Hargrove will sound distressingly familiar. The DMW will revoke or "indefinitely suspend" a driver's license on hearing a report of dangerous driving from a police officer who heard it from a "concerned citizen." Neither the police nor the DMV hearing officer assigned to the case will do more than a cursory investigation before suspending or revoking the license. The hearing officer will conduct the investigation, decide whether to revoke the license, indefinitely suspend it or, in rare cases, to simply give the driver a warning. The hearing officer also controls the lengthy testing process whereby drivers can sometimes get their licenses back.

The opportunity to present favorable evidence, notice of the allegations against you, and a hearing in front of a noninvolved adjudicator prior to being sanctioned are all components of the due process guaranteed to everyone by the Fifth

Amendment, regardless of whether the action is civil, criminal, or administrative.

Time and time again, city and state agencies, school disciplinary boards like SDSU and other quasi-judicial institutions operating outside of the court system have shown themselves to be incapable of providing the due process of law guaranteed by the Constitution. Maybe it's time to require these matters to be handled in the court system. If that takes a transfer of funds from outside adjudicators to the courts, so be it.

#### Kauai: A hiker's paradise By Noreen Kompanik

Known for its unique geography and natural wonders, Kauai is one of the most breathtaking places I've visited. A hiker's dream. Truth be told, even if you're not an avid hiker, the island's outdoors just call out to be explored.

Our hearts were set on introducing our fellow travelers to the spectacular Na Pali Coast, renowned for rugged grandeur, secluded beaches, rainbow waterfalls, and, yes, challenging, daunting hikes. Three days of heavy rains and flooding foiled our plans. Steep, treacherous cliffs and slick trails make for heart-failing excitement — just not the kind of excitement we were looking for. Even under the best conditions the Na Pali Coast can be dangerous, with its washed-out trails and narrow, stony paths clinging precariously to the edges of cliffs.

With more rain expected in the forecast, we reluctantly took locals' advice and headed south to the sunny shores of Poipu. It is here on the south side of Kauai that we found unexpected treasure.

Kauai's southern coastline features a fascinating path along the ancient, fragile ecosystem of the Maha'ulepu Heritage Trail. The trail begins on crescent-shaped Shipwrecks Beach near the Grand Hyatt in Keoneloa Bay. A fishing vessel was said to have run aground on the bay's sandbar. Though remains of the vessel are now "lost at sea," the beach retains its famous name.

Leaving the tropical white sandy beach, we were surprised to find ourselves in groves of fresh, fragrant pine trees, our path covered with thousands of soft green needles. Colorful flora and fauna of the forest surrounded us. With few hikers to be seen, we felt as if the trail was ours alone.

After a gentle grade upward, we emerged into a completely different world. Framed by azure skies and miles of deep blue sea, the stunning coastline lay before us. Views of the churning ocean were visible from vantage points over sun-bleached cliffs. Blowholes shooting occasional sprays of salty ocean water along the path demonstrated the sea's power at high tide. Binoculars in hand, we ventured closer, excited by the unexpected sight of massive humpback whales breaching in the distance.

Read before you go

The Makawehi Lithified Cliffs loomed ahead, appearing like an alien landscape. These cliffs were formed from sand dunes weathered by wind and surf over thousands of years. Crashing wave action carved sharp ridges and deep pockets in the cliffside; lithification occurred when sediments compacted, then filled pores with ground water containing high levels of minerals. All in all, a fascinating scientific explanation that translates to spectacular views.

Each bend in the path yielded more surprise. Crystal-clear tidepools teemed with tiny fish and miniature crabs, all scurrying to find safety as each wave brought more water surging in. Fossils and petroglyphs carved into the rocks lined the coastal pathways. (Paleontologists have discovered the skeletal remains of extinct birds that lived here over 1500 years ago, before Polynesian voyagers first arrived.)

Each outcropping of rock, each sheltered bay and inlet, each changing vista yielded more panoramas and *continued on page 46*

## ROAM-O-RAMA

San Diego Outdoors with the Museum Canyoneers

#### LOVE VALLEY MEADOW

A serene mountain meadow tucked into the southern flanks of Palomar Mountain

**Distance from downtown San Diego**: 66 miles. Allow 1.5 hours driving time (Palomar). From I-15 N, exit on Via Rancho Pkwy and turn right (east) onto E. Via Rancho Pkwy./Bear Valley Pkwy. Turn right on Valley Pkwy/S-6, which turns into Valley Center Rd./S-6. Turn right onto SR-76 E and drive 14.6 miles to E. Grade Rd./S-7 and turn left just east of Lake Henshaw and go 3.3 miles.



The trailhead is on the left. **Hiking Length**: 2–4 miles. **Difficulty**: Easy with 300 feet of elevation gain/loss. Hikers, bicycles, dogs (on leashes), and horses are allowed on the trail. No facilities. Adventure Pass required.

The trailhead for Love Valley Meadow can be easily missed when driving up the East Grade Road/S-7 into Palomar Mountain as it begins from the back of a deep turnout alongside the road. While not a particularly long or challenging trail, it offers the opportunity to spend a few hours enjoying the views and solitude of this pocket-sized mountain valley. Once owned by the Mendenhall family, who settled on Palomar Mountain in 1869, Love Valley has been part of the Cleveland National Forest since the 1980s. The Mendenhalls did, and still do, use Love Valley for winter grazing of cattle that summer in nearby French Valley.

The entrance gate to the trail is found at the rear of the turnout. The trail is on a wide dirt road, which is a former segment of East Grade Road. Before leaving the turnout, look for the small light blue, sometimes almost white, displays of baby blue eyes and the dark purple pea-like flowers of winter vetch.

As you descend into Love Valley, you will be rewarded with spectacular views of Lake Henshaw in San Felipe Valley. The lake came into being in 1923 with the construction of Henshaw Dam, an earthen dam 123 feet (37 m) tall and 650 feet (200 m)

If hiking in spring, look for the purple blooms of ceanothus and the hot pink flowers of rockcress sprouting from their long, slender stalks along the trail. Even the black oak will have color in spring. Although not a flower, the pink/red hue of new black oak leaves put on a colorful show before they turn to their summer green. more geological wonders. Nearby cave entrances begged to be explored, while the thundering surf below warned us of the might of the Pacific.

On our return trip, we followed the interior trail away from the direct sun and into the shade of the palm and coconut forest. Since the paths split and merged repeatedly, we were able to easily navigate a completely different route back.

Much to our surprise, we stumbled across an ancient Hawaiian burial site. The stillness was interrupted only by a gentle breeze stirring through the treetops, reminding us that for the old gods, their mana still lives here. Eyes closed, we sensed the spirit of the ancient Hawaiians on this sacred ground.

Returning to Shipwrecks Beach, we

were certain we could undertake this adventure multiple times and it would never be the same. As Louis L'Amour once said, "The trail is the thing, not the end of the trail. Travel too fast and you miss all you are traveling for."

About that initial disappointment in forgoing the Na Pali trail: nature's artistry took care of that.

To get there, take Highway 50 east from Hanapepe. Turn right on Highway 520 toward Po'ipu. At the end of 520, turn right on Koloa Road and then left on Poipu Road.

Park in the lot near the Hyatt Hotel and take the trail between this hotel and the Poipu Bay Resort golf course. Or, go to the east end of Shipwrecks Beach to access the cliff trails. The hike is a round trip of approximately three and a half miles. Plan on at least two hours.

#### **More lobsters?**

The first Wednesday in October marked the opening day of the commercial lobster season in California. In the weeks and months prior, permit holders were busy building traps, mending lines, and getting their boats ship-shape.

As the season neared, activity built to a crescendo, culminating on the Tuesday before the opener. This was the first day lobster traps could legally hold bait. A week prior to the opener, traps may be set but without bait and the doors must be wired open. According to the Fish and Wildlife website, the average permit-holder will work between 300 and 700 traps. Depending on the size of the boat, it takes many trips to set all the traps in place.

On bait day, every trap is hauled, filled with bait, and set. It makes for a 12-14-hour day for captain and crew. This year, on October 7th, ocean conditions off San Diego were calm with a one-two-foot south swell and westerly winds of eight to ten knots.

According to the Department of Fish and Wildlife website, there are currently 181 lobster operator permits in the state. The 2014 season saw 52 lobster permit holders make landings in San Diego County. Total landings for 2014 for the San Diego area were 272,683 pounds of lobster; in contrast, the Santa Barbara area saw 399,259 pounds landed.

State biologists are thinking that the warmer ocean temps we are experiencing statewide will increase this season's catch because the lobsters will be more active. At least one local fisherman had an increase of nearly 80 pounds over last year's first pull.

The last week of September, a sport diver in Long Beach reported catching a green spiny lobster, Panulirus gracilis, which are usually found in the warmer waters of

#### **Down deep off La Jolla**

Fifty years ago off the coast of La Jolla, the U.S. Navy performed experiments to find out how long humans could live underwater.

The Sealab project had three vessels, the first of which was sunk off of Florida in 1964. Then came Sealab II in 1965, built in San Francisco and submerged three quarters of a mile off shore near Scripps Institution of Oceanography. Sealab II was a nine-foothigh, 57-foot-long submersible habitat that plunged to 205 feet into La Jolla Canyon. Historian Ben Hellwarth describes it as a cylinder with room for ten aquanauts. It was connected to a support ship on the surface for communications and breathing gases. "Umbilicals" carrying fresh water, more

communications, and instrumentation data ran from buildings over the Scripps Pier and down to the capsule.

From August 28, 1965, to October 14 the same year, three teams rotated on 15-day stints. The aquanauts enjoyed hot showers, an electric stove, and refrigeration. Hellwarth says that the high helium content in the air onboard made everyone sound like Donald Duck. Astronaut-turned-aquanaut Scott Carpenter, the second U.S. man in orbit after John Glenn, stayed down on Sealab II for 30 days. A voice link was established between Carpenter and colleague Gordon Cooper, who was in orbit aboard Gemini 5.

Sealab III was sunk to 610 feet near San Clemente Island in 1969. Hours into the experiment, an experienced aquanaut died under what Hellwarth called "mysterious circumstances." The Sealab project came to an abrupt halt. It was later found that the re-breather used on a mission to patch up air leaks was empty.

## The largest beach run

It began as a sketch in 2005 and was further conceptualized at a mosaic school in Ravenna, Italy, in 2010. The ten-by-ten-foot mosaic of the Virgin of Guadalupe was completed nine months later. The piece, created by artist Mark Patterson, was installed on a train bridge wall in Encinitas with the help of his friend Bob Nichols while they posed as construction workers on April 22, 2011. It was Good Friday.

Originally, the artist was unknown and the city deemed the art graffiti and ordered

the mosaic removed. There was a backlash of support for saving it. Though some Catholics and Latinos found it offensive, a priest asked that a nearby church be able to display it. The state believed that the mosaic could violate the separation between state and church and denied the request to put the mosaic at the entrance of Moonlight Beach State Park.

Encinitas spent \$2000 for an art consultant to review how best to remove the mosaic without destroying it. It eventually was placed across the street at what is now known as Surfing Madonna Park, on the corner of Highway 101 and Encinitas Blvd.

This Saturday, the Surfing Madonna Save the Ocean run — the largest beach run in the country — takes place in the low-tide sand at Moonlight Beach, with the first start at 12:30 p.m.

#### **TROPICAL INVASION**

Inshore: The 1/2 boats have started concentrating more on the up and down fishing for rockfish, whitefish, sheephead and an occasional lingcod or halibut. Sand bass and calico bass are picking back up a little. With the lack of bait and large sand bass in San Diego bay the past couple winters, those fishing the bay bass tournament in 2016 are pre-fishing for the larger calico bass off the pilings and structure towards the bay mouth There's pelagic fun for all this year, as yellowfin and skipiack

tuna have been caught by inshore kayakers and even a few reported caught from Imperial Beach Pier.

Outside: Wahoo! There have been quite a few wahoo caught in San Diego waters from both sportfishers and private boaters, even as far north as off Ventura. Wahoo were photographed through the glass-bottom tour boat at Catalina Island. This year has been the best opportunity to catch one of the toothy speedsters within 20 miles of Point Loma in a lifetime. The yellowfin tuna numbers continue to drop though they are out there pretty thick. Dorado counts are still dropping a bit, but occasionally a boat comes

across a kelp paddy loaded with them. There are still some striped and blue marlin ranging about along with some shortbill spearfish.

10/11 - 10/17 Dock Totals: 3,947 anglers aboard 161 boats out of San Diego landings caught 70 wahoo, 7,557 yellowfin tuna, 22 bluefin tuna, 1,593 yellowtail, 657 dorado, 1,792 skipjack tuna, 469 calico bass, 428 sand bass, 13 barracuda, 1,433 rockfish, 80 sheephead, 8 rubberlip seaperch, 5 halibut, 731 bonito, 29 whitefish, 1 lingcod, 1 shortbill spearfish, 1 white seabass and 88 spiny lobster. Notably, a 3/4 day trip mid-week to the Coronado Islands carrying 10 anglers boated 29 wahoo.

■acebook HQ is four blocks away from our winery," says Buff. "We're up in Menlo Park." He takes a sip from his glass.

"We need to be near the movers and shakers up there because we also store a lot of their exotic cars. I'm storing everything from a 1929 Rolls Royce to Ben Sloss's Ferrari FXX K."

Ben Sloss, turns out, is a VP at

Google. The FXX K goes for \$2.7 million. Buff wears a black golf shirt with an Alfa Romeo patch on it. He fills his glass from his bottle of Stag's Leap Petite Sirah and attacks his Po Pazzo burger.

Guess this is the type of guy you meet in here. One of the go-to joints for the business class in Little Italy, or that's how it feels. It's happy hour, crowded. I got drawn in here when the greeter outside said the magic words: "Half off barmenu food items!"

I squeezed onto my bar stool just as a singer launched into Mack the Knife, and Sara the barkeep pointed to the clock.

"One minute."

"Huh?

"One minute left in happy hour."

Yikes. I abandon the car talk and grab the one-page happy-hour list of food and drinks. I see Buff's Po Pazzo burger (usually \$12, but 6 bucks for the next 60 seconds) is made from Angus beef. His sure looks good with its big patty, shiny bun, and fresh lettuce and tomato. But right next to it on the menu is a filet and fries, "4-oz filet demi-glace truffle fries" for \$8. Or short-rib sliders with pecorino cheese for \$6.50.

"Most popular?" says Sara. "Lobster Mac." Oh, yeah. "Lobster Mac with Orecchiette

["small ear," an ear-shaped pasta from the south of Italy] & aged cheddar," \$6. D'aaah... Eyes rush ahead. Spaghetti Bolognese "with a traditional Sunday sauce," \$5.50; chicken skewers and whipped blue cheese (\$6); and, wild boar flatbread (\$6.50), with some sort of "house-made"

ent: "Sugo," whatever the heck that is. It's \$6 HH for a beef rib and meat ball with Sunday Sauce and English peas.

And I ask for the "Baby Kale Caesar salad" (\$4.50) with shaved Parmigiano, mainly because you also get fried anchovies with it. Love anchovies.

"Drink?" says Sara quickly. No time to dither. I go for the first on the happyhour list of reds. Hayman and Hill, a Cabernet from Paso Robles. Five buckeroos.

pork sausage, plus mozzarella, glazed onion, chili.

Natch, I end up with something totally differ-

I get the order out just before the clock ticks to the half hour.

Whew. I settle back, check out the scene. Looks like a prosperous crowd. Interior's basically one long mottled granite bar on this side, with scattered brownish booths on the other, cream walls with art, the piano, and in the middle of the back wall, a picture of Joe Busalacchi. Oh, right. The Busalacchi family. Lots of restaurants. Thought I detected a generous feel about the place. They've always been old-school Italian. So, no surprise that the gal's singing oldies like "Fly Me to the Moon." Somehow it works. Somehow I hope the next one is "Volare."

By the time my food comes, Buff has chowed down his burger completely. "Good," he says, wiping his fingers. "Very, very good. The Angus meat, the marination, and for what? Six bucks?"

Now a long plate of steaming meat in tomato sauce sits in front of me. And a second square platter with a green kale salad piled in the middle. And a glass of ruby-red vino. I take a slurp, then chop into the \$6 meat dish. It's beef, falling off a big ol' bone. Peas put in an ap-pea-rance — heh-heh — but mostly they're all drowning in the rich red sauce. Beside the rib is this meatball, hovering like a little satellite.

But "Sunday Sauce?" "Sugo?" What the heck are these?

"'Sugo' is just a word for 'sauce," says Tizziano, the Italian head barman. "It's like a ragu, or Bolognese. And 'Sunday sauce'? Same thing."

"So, what am I eating here in this sugo?" I ask. "This rib of yours is the bone they cut the ribeye steak out of."

Huh. See an actual ribeye, 16 oz, goes for \$34. Oh, man. Next time...after the lottery win?

But, no, this ribeye leftover shank is good, filling, rich, tasty comfort food. And actually the herby meatball makes a nice contrast. And what's totally delicious is the sugo price tag: \$6 rather than \$34.

Kale salad's refreshing, too, with plenty of cheese, but (sigh) only one anchovy, hidden in batter.

Buff and I yak on about wines. I try to keep up. Turns out he intended to set up a climatecontrolled warehouse in Menlo Park where people could store their wine and exotic cars. But he ended up buying a bona fide vineyard as well, Woodside. Oldest winery in San Mateo County. "Our most expensive wine? From vines brought over from France in 1884. La Questa cabernet," he says. "\$100 a bottle."

How big is the vineyard? "Robert Mondavi spills more wine than we make."

Somehow it fits. I mean, hey, I don't own a vineyard, ain't got no 1929 Rolls Royce, and when I stumble out onto India, I'm \$16.74 poorer. But for some crazy reason, I'm feeling pretty darned good.

#### Korean street treat

Zion Market, 7655 Clairemont Mesa Boulevard, Kearny Mesa. I hit the food court at Zion Market recently. The large Korean supermarket in

Kearny Mesa has a great number of distinct little businesses under its roof, and I cruised the pan-

Asian area for a few minutes before picking up a decent noodle stir-fry. But what really caught my attention was a booth advertising walnut pastries.

Cocohodo, it's called, and by the name you might think there's something chocolaty involved, but that's not the case. These things go

by the Korean name hodo kwaja, and a little research tells me they're a popular South Korean street treat designed around walnut and sweet redbean paste.

I wondered for a moment whether these could be considered gluten-free, but no. They're made using flour, and the bean paste seems to be glutinous. They're definitely cute, with

pastry shells shaped like walnuts containing sweet innards. Or, if you prefer, like little brains filled with red, gooey goodness. Halloween is approaching, after all.

I picked up a small bag of nine for about four bucks, though were I heading to a housewarming or some other fête I might be inclined to pick up one of several snazzy-looking gift-box options ranging from \$7.50 to \$35.

They're tasty, and definitely not like most desserts you'll find in San Diego. The sweet red-bean paste seems a distant cousin of a chocolate truffle - not quite as rich or satisfying but great as an alternative for the chocolate-averse. The pastry surrounding it comes off like a soft buckwheat crêpe or maybe a thin, spongy waffle. These things are bite-size yet individually wrapped, which stopped me from popping one after another into my mouth.

> They also tend to be a little dry, suggesting that coffee might be in order. Cocohodo, a chain making

its way deeper into Southern California's Korean communities, offers single-origin coffees from Ethiopia and Guatemala. If you want to hang out for a bit, they also offer mochi, so following up your coffee and walnut pastry with a bite-size ice cream treat is an option.

## Oceanside's coffee revolution

**Revolution Roasters** opened its first retail shop in mid-September on the Coast Highway in Oceanside. The roaster continues to cook beans where it started as a wholesaler four years ago — in the back of Leucadia's **Coffee Coffee** restaurant and café. However, by staking out a space eight miles north, owners Dan and Miriah Scheibe hope to bring their brand of specialty coffee to a wider market.

"We really saw a huge opportunity in this area — it's really blossoming," says Miriah, refer-

ring to a stretch at the south end of Oceanside around Vista Way. "The beer scene is happening, the cocktails are happening, the food's happening — and there was just really no coffee yet."

Miriah quit her job in biotech last year to focus on growing the coffee business but says she didn't do so expecting to open a café. "It was never the plan to open our own space," she explains, "We had initially started as a wholesale roasting company — that was our goal and dream."

But seven or eight months ago, she got to thinking that opening a retail space was the best way to market their coffee. "We just realized it was a little bit hard for us to grow our brand without our own café presence."

Dan Scheibe still works in biotech full-time, roasting on weekends. Assistant roaster Kasey May says the smell of coffee roasting in Coffee Coffee has become a cherished ritual for its Leucadia customers and the roasters alike. However, he adds that he welcomes the opportunity to control their coffee's preparation in his role as manager of the new shop. He and the staff enjoy experimenting with different extraction

theories after-hours to fine tune their product for quality and consistency.

He says they also value having direct feedback from their customers, using it to refine their roasting practice. "We have already made a few small tweaks and adjustments to some of our roasting profiles," he says, "which is exactly what we were hoping for out of this place."

Revolution offers light, medium, and dark roasts, depending on a bean's origin, but skews a little darker than some of its Roast Highway neighbors. This seems to be in keeping with many of their customers' tastes, and several loyal North County customers have already sought out Revolution's beans in Oceanside. "We have a lot of those traditional flavors that a lot of people associate with coffee," May explains. "Deep chocolate notes, caramels, and a bitter roastiness, a woodiness."

Decorated by an eclectic assortment of antiques and vintage curiosities — including a wild boar's head — the airy shop offers drip, single-origin pour-over, and espresso drinks, plus a chocolaty cold-brew blend of Honduran and Ethiopian beans, available on nitro. A full kitchen will eventually serve baked goods plus breakfast and lunch dishes, but in the meantime the menu focuses on third-party pastries, coffee and ice cream affogatos, and rotating seasonal concoctions involving simple syrups and fresh local ingredients. ■

I'm pretty sure this is the first time I tasted the food while sober, too. But it was just as tasty and gratifying as it was when I was hungry and buzzed. It was the middle of the day this time, certainly no time to be drinking. At least that's what I thought before I spotted "champagne slushie" on the menu, which turned out to be the best Slurpee ever. I got the raspberry version with vermouth, cava, lemon, raspberry, and bitters. It was refreshing and relaxing.

I hadn't realized before that the restaurant is all outdoors. Sure, there was shade, but between the big wooden slats overhead there was nothing to separate us from the sky above.

It was stupid of us to order the broccolin (\$4). I love all kinds of broccoli — I even snack on it raw — but in a place that specializes in meatballs it's just not that appealing. If there was nothing else on the table, this broccolini (flavored with garlic, lemon, and parmesan) would have been way more scrumptious. But set beside hot and steamy sliders and a lump of fried polenta covered in cheese, it was barely noticeable.

Of the sliders, my favorites were just as good as I remembered. I get the classic Bovine (beef with marinara and mozzarella) and the Lamb Slider (with tzaziki), which is not on the menu but sometimes written on the board. David wanted to go double pig with

that's located super far from your table" type of place. The grill is *in* the table.

We lucked out by getting in just in time to take advantage of the weekend brunch special (Saturday and Sunday from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.), a 20 percent discount off the big Gyu-Kaku multi-course meal for two (\$48 instead of the usual \$60). When the plates began to arrive, we wondered if we'd ever be able to eat it all. But because you can only cook so many things at a time, each course was well paced, with plenty of time to sip our sake, chat, and gauge our satisfaction.

The restaurant is a chain with 32 locations, 13 of which are in Southern California, but this one in Scripps Ranch is the only one in San Diego. Gyu-Kaku means "Horn of the Bull," and the chain prides itself on the quality of its meat. When I tasted the Harami Skirt Steak Miso, a 21-day-aged Angus skirt steak marinated in the joint's signature miso sauce, I could see why they'd name the place after this protein instead of the chicken or shrimp that also came with our extensive meal.

We repeatedly checked to verify that the heat was turned up all the way, as some items seemed to take forever to cook. The Mushroom Medley, which arrived wrapped in foil that we were instructed to leave on as the mushrooms cooked, never did cook. It was the first thing to go on the grill and the last to come off, and those mushrooms remained raw. Eventually we put them directly on the heat, but by the time one became soft enough to bite, I was over it.

It was a sweet surprise to discover that our dessert was "make-your-own s'mores." It didn't seem very Japanese, but we had fun with it, roasting our marshmallows over the flame between us and squishing it and the chocolate between two Graham crackers.

My go-to - the Sandy Eggan (\$7.50) with eggs, cheese, and avocado spread — is tasty with the creamy avocado and fluffy scrambled eggs, but there's a salty/savory component that is missing. I end up with too many eggs for my bread-toegg ratio. But if David orders the Daniel (\$7.95) with turkey, bacon, and provolone cheese, then both of our sandwiches are enhanced — he gives me a slice of that salty, chewy bacon, and I hand over half of my eggs.

Ball — it's just kitschy, like they just threw everything together. I mean, there's a silver horse lamp right here, and there's a gold-framed cow right behind your head."

"I get it, you hate the interior design," I said. "I actually like the hodge-podgey look, the fact that the windows open out to the corner of a busy downtown street, and that fake grass stuff on the patio. I like seeing green. But forget about the decor for a second. Can we talk about the food? The food is fantastic. The last time you enjoyed a cacio e pepe dish this much was at one of Mario Batali's places in New York."

"It was Lupa," David said, smiling now. "And, yeah, this version is right up there with my ideal version."

The simple elegance of the classic cheese-and-pepper dish has always appealed to David, but for years he'd failed to find a version that came close to the flavors he'd enjoyed that first time. He's always saying, "It's so simple. I don't know how they manage to miss the mark." But here at Double Standard he approved of the house-made al dente bucatini tossed with parmesan, romano, and tellicherry pepper.

Alas, it seems the menu occasionally changes, and David's cacio e pepe was one of the casualties. But he enjoyed everything else we tasted, including the prosciutto bruschetta with house-made ricotta, mission figs, toasted pistachios, and chestnut honey (\$12).

I'm a sucker for a sweet/ savory combo, and this bite had the added bonus of several exciting textures, from the crispy crust and crunchy pistachios to the creamy ricotta, chewy bread, figs, and prosciutto.

Another win in the pasta department (all pastas are made fresh in-house) was the Spicy Pappardelle Bolognese, with braised short rib and Italian sausage, which is also made in-house (\$23).

Brussels sprouts are still everywhere, and though I'm slightly fatigued by the trend, we did enjoy sharing Double Standard's take with applecider glaze, bacon, parmesan, and grapes.

"You know, if you don't like hanging out here, I can always come with friends and bring food back to you," I said to David as we were leaving.

In September, Rip Current founders Paul Sangster and Guy Shobe brought five beers to the Great American Beer Festival, the nation's biggest beer contest. The former homebrewers returned victorious, with two medals and the Very Small Brewery of the Year distinction.

What may surprise Rip Current fans is that one of those five beers was not the brewery's popular IPA, Lupulin Lust — despite its recent silver medal showing at the International Beer Festival competition.

Sangster believes that has to do with the timing of the

Great American Beer Festival competition. "They require you to send your beer way in advance," Sangster says, "Like, two months. Beers that taste great fresh — that's not what they're going to taste like when the judge gets [them].

Sangster knows well how the judging works. He's a certified master judge who has experience with both sides of beer competitions. Knowing the hoppy aromatics of Lupulin Lust wouldn't last two months to reach the judges' table, he and Shobe decided to focus on styles that could handle the lag time.

"It was kind of a hard question," Sangster says. "Out of the 25 beers we make, how do we choose five?'

The first beer they chose was Break Line Bock, which wound up winning gold in the Bock category. The competition's rules state the traditional dark brown German style should be made with all malt, possessing toasted or nutty flavors and aromas, but not caramel. "That's the first one that really stood out to me as a great example of the style," Sangster says, adding, "That's where the beer-judge experience comes in. You kind of take a critical review how they match style guidelines."

The rest of the winning lineup included Night Surfing Munich Dunkel, Take Off Belgian Tripel, and Black Lagoon Scottish Strong Ale, the silver-

medal winner. The fifth entry was What Would Dave Drink?, a Belgian Dark Strong recipe by late homebrewer Dave Levonian, who had been a popular member of the same homebrewing club as Sangster and Shobe.

ery because it produced under 1000 barrels in 2014. However, due to recent expansions to its brewing system, Sangster anticipates the San

Marcos brewery will finish 2015 closer to 1600 barrels. That means next year it will qualify as a Small Brewery. competing with producers of up to 14,999 barrels.

It also means new beers are on the horizon and that the brewery will explore bottling its beer in 2016. Next up for Rip Current will be a pair of special releases. the brewerv also hopes to release its first official barrel-aged beer, an 18-month bourbon-aged take on silver medalist Black Lagoon.

creating movie soundtracks, refuses to regroup the original band. Elfaizy says Elfman has seen Dead Man's Party and has been supportive of his ersatz Oingo.

Then there is original Oingo

that Elfaizy change Dead Man's Party vanity URL from *OingoBoingoTribute* to something else. She also stated that she had no problem if the Belly Up and Elfaizy said Dead Man's Party was "a tribute to

Oingo Boingo" but that "Oingo Boingo tribute band" was not acceptable in advertising or promotion.

Elfaizy says he was told by his attorney that he was completely within his rights to bill his band as an Oingo Boingo tribute band, just as it's okay to say something like "tastes like Coca-Cola," as long as you don't misrepresent yourself as the actual band.

Local intellectual property attorney David Branfman agrees.

"I have never seen or heard of a case where XYZ tribute band was pursued legally by the original XYZ band for calling themselves a tribute band — as long as they don't mislead the public into thinking they're the real deal.... In fact, I don't even see where the name 'Oingo Boingo' is even officially registered as a trademark in the first place.

"Ironically, I could see where Danny Elfman or whoever really does control the Oingo Boingo name/trademark could have a real problem with Mr. Vatos's 'Oingo Boingo Dance Party? That could very possibly confuse the public into thinking it's the real 'Oingo Boingo.""

On October 7 Pineda said via email that she would respond to questions regarding her demands to Dead Man's Party, but she failed to respond further.

Dead Man's Party plays the Belly Up on October 24, and

"We had become a little spent on some of the superficiality and oversaturation of the New York music scene," says David Hyman of the Sinclairs, which originally formed in Brooklyn around 2008. ences about "flipping over cop cars, full-scale riots," and stints in juvenile hall into lyrics for his band Long Tall Sally. "They called me Kelly English because I was the Slim Shady of punk. Eventually, I legally changed my last name to English."

Based in San Marcos, English now fronts the Infidelz. Because opportunities for local punk bands are scarce, English decided to become a promoter and hire big-name headliners so the Infidelz could get opening band breaks at venues in San Diego and Orange County. "In the short time we've been

together, we've opened for the Cadillac Tramps, Guttermouth, Rat City Riot, D.I., and the Dickies?

He rages against the concert business that he says is smothering the music he loves, claiming agents are nothing but greedy gatekeepers with a stranglehold on bands.

> "Agents want top dollar and then they want more. You have to give them a guarantee, then they want 85 percent of everything over your expenses on top of that."

English says he covered about half of the \$2000 guarantee for the Dickies he promoted at Brick by Brick in July.

"It seems like San Diego is not a friendly atmosphere for punk rock," says

English. He says the 21-andup venues in Orange County seem to get better turnouts. "If we could have gotten the younger crowd in for the Dickies, we would have done much better."

Still, he's not giving up. "I'm 46, and this is probably my last band, but I want it to last as long as I live. We go into the studio in November. I'll be promoting again after the first of the year."

Daybreaking. The mood inside Grotto Climbing off of Alvarado Road is opposite the flaring tempers in morningdrive traffic outside. People dance to thumping bass beats, climbers scale the bouldering walls, an artist paints psychedelic images, and yogis practice in the back room.

This curious scene is called a "sunrise party," and Rise 'n' Shine is the first in San Diego. First made popular by the group Daybreaker in New York City, sunrise parties bring a sober, healthoriented club scene to the morning.

Rise 'n' Shine was organized by Aaron Null, the creator of the weekly Bass Tribe party at Club Atomic. Collaborating with Daybreaker took too long, so Null hosted his own sunrise party the morning of September 30.

"I know the Daybreaker's stuff is still pretty clubby. It's definitely centered around the beats," said Null. "But we're going to have yoga, a bunch of food...we're going to have massage there, too." Null recruited others

Cantrell is familiar with Daybreaker parties and noted the differences, especially in the music. "This one is a whole lot quieter, more 'sunrise music' while the other one ... it's a little more of a dancev vibe, a little bit more intense,"

said Cantrell.

Another difference was crowd size - whereas Daybreaker probably would have packed the place, Rise 'n' Shine, with its 80 participants, had plenty of room to stretch out in the 9000-square-foot climbing gym.

Live artist Hill Young thinks San Diego is the perfect place for this kind of party. "When Aaron hit me up, I was, like, 'Ah, cool, they're doing one of these in San Diego!' It seems like it'll be a good draw for it because there are lots of yogis, lots of morning beach people," says Young.

ing the late 1980s had yet to be invented. I fancy Mudhoney today as a band that survives for no other reason than it becomes a place for old-timers to meet and make the old sounds. For even though Mudhoney influenced a generation, they themselves never saw commercial success. Money and the band went together like, well, mud and honey. Ten records, some of them brilliant, but they never earned the financial comfort of such followers as Nirvana or Soundgarden.

The roots of what would become Mudhoney began during high school as teen-boy humor; listenability came second on the list. But membership in a band was a good thing and eventually, classmates Stone Gossard and Jeff Ament would hook up with Arm to form Green River, which begat Mother Love Bone. which begat Pearl Jam with ex-San Diegan Eddie Vedder. Mudhoney (not to be confused with Mudbone or Mudcrutch), in keeping with the theme of bad-boy humor, is actually the title



of a lo-fi sexploitation film from the late '60s. Not counting Pearl Jam, today, Mudhoney are among the last men standing in a much-loved genre that has long since disappeared. I'm not entirely sure that they've noticed or care. Tar Halos and the Grids also perform.

On their latest release, the Oxford natives show maturity and growth. as What Went Down displays their current state; an abundance of grit and intensity musters a fuller. more dynamic sound that feels fresh.

Build-ups and breakdowns are a common musical theme throughout the record, but songs like "Give It All" and "London Thunder" instrumentally put you in a trance as they prepare you for what's to follow. "Snake Oil" mimics the Black Keys in its complexity, while "Night Swimmers" revisits an early Foals sound of dreamy, aquatic guitar and bass grooves that prance beside the shuffling drums that flooded their sophomore effort, Total Life Forever

What Went Down satisfies in the fact that Foals alters their sound without alienating their prior selves. The playfulness remains intact with a hint of anger and depth, making it a great listen for the average listener, but maybe overindulgent to Foals' hardcore fans.

Sharing walls with the Stone Company Store in the historic McClintock building by Santa Fe Depot, the Flight Path juxtaposes the 1928 warehouse's original exposed columns and polished concrete flooring against all-white minimal modern Italian furnishing. It's a stretch to say the lounge is located beneath the actual flight path to Lindbergh Field, but the concept carries that the place is a hub from which to travel the world via choice flights of reds and whites and over 70 rotating global boutique and value wines emphasizing regional flavors and rare varietals.

The best time to see what they're all about is during the daily happy hour, when a "business class" selection of wines goes for \$6 a glass, "first class" for \$8, Ciara's sangria for \$5, a variety of appetizers for \$5, and flatbreads for \$8. The dining menu makes use of organic, locally sourced ingredients (when available) to create a number of California-Italian dishes interspersed with turkey meatball subs, crafty sliders, gourmet grilled-cheese sandwiches, and plenty of vegetarian options.

Most indicative of the kitchen's ingenuity in veggie plates is the vegetable ceviche. As a huge fan of a good fish or shrimp ceviche, I was taken away by the crisp, refreshing stack of cucumber, tomato, avocado, radish, jalapeño, onion, and cilantro served with warm flatbread, which comes out fresh and pliable. It's a regionally inspired tribute to bruschetta and pairs well with the happy hour Chilean G7 sauvignon blanc, both being bright and acidic, perfect for the humid afternoon. The baked goat cheese spread, served with pesto and toasted bread, made for an almost decadent "main" happy-hour dish followed by an oaky, red glass of carmenere by Chilean vineyard Corinto.

The Beach Boys and Herman & the Hermits play softly from the stereo as employees of neighboring businesses drift in for take-

out orders of caprese salad and baked focaccia bread. The dining room, which seats about 40, hums with huddled conversations and the occasional wine-fueled belly laugh. Just before 5 p.m., the music shifts to Sinatra as Ciara, after whom the house sangria takes its name, ignites tea lights across the white marble bar top.

All told, the Flight Path is an accessible wine lounge that appeals to the peepers as much as the palate at prices that are hard to come by in the neighboring wine nexus of Little Italy with service that is among the best in town

# German currents

MOVIES

he 5th Annual German Currents Film Festival adds a new, somewhat surprising name to this year's roster of theaters. *Jack* kicks things off on Saturday night at Balboa Park's Natural History Museum, while across the Prado, MoPA's Joan and Irwin Jacobs Theatre plays home to a pair of family matinees. And while it's the last place one might expect

to find a film festival, you can figure in the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center as one of

this year's screening venues. German Currents San Diego program director Tobias Queck assures me the Blu-ray image looks great — just don't expect the full-dome treatment.

The festival runs October 24 and 25. For more information, visit germancurrentssd.org. Here are my thoughts on two of this weekend's offerings.

We Are Young, We Are Strong Sunday October 25, 2015, 5:30 p.m. at the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center It was the biggest anti-immigration riot Germany had seen since, well... you know. On August 24, 1992, a group of angry, disillusioned youth took it upon themselves to attempt a mini-ethnic cleansing on a refugee shelter located in the Lichtenhagen district of Rostock that housed a group of journalists and over 100 Vietnamese emigrants.

The events unravel from the alternating points-of-view of the victims, most notably Lien (Trang Le Hong); their aggressors Stefan (Jonas Nay), Jennie (Saskia Rosendahl), and Goldhahn (Paul Gäbler), among others; and Martin (Devid Striesow), a politician torn between duty and his love for a hoodlum son. Director and co-writer Burhan Qurbani remains steadfast in his refusal to varnish the truth. When asked his thoughts on a final solution to the refugee problem, Robbie (Joel Basman) — easily the gang's most repugnant (and watchable) member suggests they find meaningful employment, echoing Hitler's inspirational rallying cry, "Arbeit macht frei." The phrase, German for "Work sets you free," greeted prisoners on their way into Auschwitz.

The events leading up to the riot are shot in black-and-white and composed for 1.85, with the climactic clash playing out in color and widescreen. Cinematographer Yoshi Heimrath handles each format with equal aplomb, his sleek, steady aerial work and sinewy passes through the crowd adding tension with every turn. For the most part, Qurbani refuses to use the violent payoff as a means reuniting his characters. Don't expect a tearful father-and-son reunion to cap things off. But by the same token, I could have done without the cheesy shot of the two lovers' hands meeting amid soft focus back-

ground flames. To the cheers of

locals, some 3000 strong and all acting like participants in a giant tailgating party, Stefan gets to throw out the first Molotov. Given the film's relatively small budget, the re-creation of events is surprisingly spectacular.

Even though the story made headlines, it's time to issue a SPOILER ALERT! No one was hurt as a result of the attack. Can one imagine a payoff such as this in an American action film? In lesser hands, this could have dissolved into violent video-game trash like *The Raid* films. Without showing sympathy for his aimless characters, Qurbani instead focuses on what led to the atrocious act, and why it took place at this particular point in Germany's post-Reunification history.

It's a film that's as topical as today's headlines. The front page of this morning's Yahoo News read, "German anti-migrant rally highlights European backlash." Hopefully, the timeliness will help the film find an American distributor. Burhan Qurbani will be there for the screening to answer your questions.

#### About a Girl

Sunday October 25, 2015, 12:30 p.m. at the Museum of Photographic Arts. Though it's screening as a family matinee, I'd be sure and keep the little ones away from this dark, death-obsessed black comedy about a rebellious girl whose failed suicide attempt leads to what the program notes describe as a discovery of "what fun life and love can really be!"

The film opens on what's become a blistering digital cliché: the current boyfriend of 15-year-old Charleen's (Jasna Fritzi Bauer) mother unwittingly stumbles into traffic and is instantly flattened by an oncoming CG bus.

Smart-aleck Charleen displays an unhealthy affinity for suicidal singers (Hendrix, Winehouse, and especially

Cobain). Meanwhile, Mom (Heike Makatsch) is too busy with her own life to notice any warning signs. And best friend Isa (Amelie Plaas-Link) tries her best to understand. Unable to take her seriously, Charleen instead credits Isa's good looks with rendering her invisible.

After surviving a hairdryer in the bathtub, Charleen must face the embarrassment of being the only botched suicide in her class. It takes some time for *About a Girl* to find its legs. It isn't until mother and daughter begin to bond and love arrives in the form of bespectacled geek Linus (Sandro Lohmann) — he chauffeurs Charleen around in a shopping cart and has a burning desire to play dunk-and-fry with his hamster that director Mark Monheim and his talented young star find their groove. — Scott Marks

#### HOT TICKET: PAUL ESPINOSA FILM FESTIVAL

Perhaps it was the decade-long absence, but Paul Espinosa is one of those local treasures we don't hear enough about. The award-winning writer, producer, director, social activist, and Kensington resident is currently being honored with a month-long retrospective of his documentaries. Espinosa was absent from the local movie scene for almost ten years after being "recruited very persuasively by Arizona State University to help found a new school of transborder studies during the time that I was there." But last spring, he retired from teaching and moved back to town.

After festival retrospectives in El Paso, Albuquerque, and Phoenix, Paul's work is once again being showcased in the town he calls home. "It's an honor," he says with a smile in his voice. "Much of my work has been done in and around San Diego and its border regions. To be able to present this work in San Diego is terrific for me and also wonderful for audiences to be able to see the films, which in some cases hasn't been available in quite a while."

His best known film is probably the 1985 docudrama *The Lemon Grove Incident*, that he wrote and produced for KPBS. "It's really kind of a mixed genre," he recalled. "It has true documentary elements — interviews with real people who are recounting their memories and experiences about this early segregation case that took place in 1930. Intermixed with these real memories are dramatized scenes of what happened. The film



is about 80 percent dramatized reenactment and 20 percent interviews with real people, along with some archival motion picture footage." The film took home dozens of film festival awards as well as a trio of Emmys from the San Diego Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

Good news for Paul, bad news for those who want to attend the festival: Friday night's presentation of *The Lemon Grove Incident* at UCSD's Cross Cultural Center is sold out. Ditto the Digital Gym's screening of *The Hunt for Pancho Villa* on November 4. There are, however, plenty of seats still available for MoPA's November 10 presentation of ...and the earth did not swallow him. It too shall sell out, so get your tickets now.

**99 Homes** — Michael Shannon gets the thankless task of trying to humanize Wall Street's capitalist swine Gordon Gekko, right down to the speech about how hard work never really helped anybody get ahead and the passing of the moral buck on to the whole rotten, rigged, remorseless system. (Thankless because it's Gekko's gleeful inhumanity that makes the character fun to watch and hate.) And just to make things interesting, he has to do it in pale pastels and earth tones blanched by the Florida sunshine — he works in real estate instead of stocks, see, and a fair chunk of his time is spent conducting evictions on heartbroken homeowners in the wake of that market's crash. The amazing thing is that he mostly manages the job, passing his poison philosophy on

to a hotel-dwelling construction worker (Andrew Garfield) who wants to buy back the family home. But the protege is the film's first weak point: his avowed decency - he loves his simple mom and moppety son! — is a flimsy thing, and its quick collapse leaves our hero both pathetic and despicable. Weak point number two is co-writer and director Ramin Bahrani's (At Any Price) failure to trim the fat off of several scenes. 2015. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Beasts of No Nation — The cradle of humanity becomes a crucible of its opposite. Netflix's first forav into the aters makes the most of the big screen's additional square footage by placing its small subject on a very large canvas: specifically, Agu (Abraham Attah), an African boy on the cusp of adolescence, navigating his way through the nightmare morass - physical, social, personal - of war. (Screenwriter-director-cinematog rapher Cary Joji Fukanaga (Jane Eyre) regularly pulls back to give us the long view, so we know that however significant an event, it is only ever one thing in a profound and complex vastness.) "I am a good boy from a good family," attests Agu at the outset, and it's true. But soon his family is shattered, and goodness is muddied with the need to survive and the desire for revenge. Agu comes under the wing - or perhaps falls under the shadow - of a brutal, charismatic commandant (Idris Elba, evincing menacing

swagger and seductive affection in equal measure), and soon, his pravers to God are laced with despairing equivocation. ("The worst sin" is also "the right thing to be doing.") A consuming, harrowing adventure story that holds onto hope in spite of horror. 2015. — M.L.  $\star \star \star \star$ (LANDMARK HILLCREST)

**Black Mass** — Johnny Depp disappears into the role of real-life gangster Whitey Bulger - receding hairline and icy blue eyes abetted by vocal fry and a sour sneer compounded from equal parts rodent and snake. But the real story here is FBI agent John Connolly (a beefy Joel Edgerton), who gets the bright idea of teaming up with his old pal from the neighborhood (Southie!) in an effort to bring down the baddies with vowels at the end of their surnames. What starts out as a daring bid for rapid advancement quickly turns - surprise! - into a morally murky and decidedly one-way relationship, with Connolly forever seeking to justify a primal allegiance to his native tribe and its crazypants chief. Depp puts on a good show, but the movie doesn't really move. It's just Whitey doing evil, often violent things, and various narrators explaining those evil, often violent things, and Connolly ignoring those evil, often violent things. Until suddenly, it all starts to unravel. (One character complains that a vise is closing in, but durned if the viewer senses any gradual increase in pressure.) Southie looks appropriately dingy, and

evervone has fun trying on a Boston accent, especially Benedict Cumberbatch as Whitey's brother the State Senator But it would have been worthwhile to spend less time on strangling and more on the mechanics of both FBI-protected gang life and FBI-conducted investigation. Scott Cooper (Out of the Furnace) directs. 2015. — M.L.  $\star$  (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Breathe (Respire) — Melanie Laurent (The Adopted) serves up a sexy slice of French sisterhood gone sour, starring Josephine Japy and Lou de Laage. Subtitled. 2014. (ANGELIKA FILM CENTER)

Bridge of Spies — Call it Mr. Donovan goes to East Berlin. Steven Spielberg and Tom Hanks team up for a handsome piece of very pointed nostalgia (with help from the Coen Brothers and Matt Charman, who handled the script, and cinematographer Janusz Kaminski, lens set to "stately."). Hanks is private citizen and shrewd attorney James Donovan, a doughy guy with a spine of grade-A Bethlehem steel and a mind that cherishes pragmatism without yielding principle. He is America's best self, ready to be deployed against her enemies - both within and without. Sure, the Russians are bad: it's 1957, and kids are getting traumatized in school by cartoons about what to do in case of nuclear attack. Plus, they've riddled the country with spies, one of whom needs defending in a court of law if America's gonna look like the good guy. (Hello, Mr.

Everything else is just the ordinary life of a college professor showily presented by director Michael Almereyda and sympathetically portrayed by Peter Sarsgaard. There are a few feints at considerations of human nature, and a word is spoken in defense of obedience, but the film serves better to start a

#### Goodnight Mommy (Ich seh, Ich

**seh)** — After she returns home from a grueling round of facial reconstruction surgery, Mommy's paranoid twin boys begin to question whether she's the genuine article. Filmmakers Severin Fiala and Veronika Franz must have stolen a look at the box cover to Eyes Without A Face because all they learned from Georges Franju's genuinely unnerving horror classic (and obvious inspiration) was how to wrap bandages. Props in reel one conveniently come back into play. A visit by comic relief Red Cross volunteers goes nowhere. Pay close attention to the framing during the pre-credit sequence and you'll have the big third act reveal figured out in no time. Cinematographer Martin Gschlacht's handsomely manicured frames can only lend so much credibility to an otherwise slow-burning tortureporn reversal on Mommy Dearest. Those touting it as one of the most terrifying films ever made were probably given similar nightmares by the monumentally nonfrightening Blair Witch Project. **Goosebumps** — Call it the *Alien/Aliens* effect. One alien on a single spaceship is a horror story, but a thousand aliens in a colony is almost necessarily an action pic. Stine's series of young adult horror novels may have been enough to make kids leave the hall light on, the release of all those monsters at once is much more spectacle than scare. (Hey, a giant praying mantis! Hey, a werewolf! Hey, a malevolent talking dummy! Etc.) Maybe it's for the best; maybe a truly scary story would have alienated the target demographic, or their parents. But weirdly, the heart-stopping moments are replaced with the heartthrobbing variety, as a newly arrived teen (Dylan Minnette) falls for a girl (Odeya Rush) who's like something out of a storybook. Rob Letterman (Monsters vs. Aliens) directs, and Jack Black goofs his way through as the famous author. 2015. — M.L. ● (IN WIDE RELEASE)

**He Named Me Malala** — Pakistani teenager Malala Yousafzai is the co-author of the bestselling memoir *I Am Malala: The Girl Who Stood Up for Education and Was Shot by The Taliban.* Davis Guggenheim's (*Waiting for Super*- *man*) prettily padded documentary/ advocacy alert tells the story of before and after that violence, placing special emphasis, as the title suggests, on the influence of Malala's principled, devoted father, educator Ziauddin Yousafzai Also on her attempts to live as a normal daughter and schoolgirl in England while advocating for girls' education all over the world. It's a compelling story, but it's not a compelling movie. How Guggenheim manages to convey such a feeling of polite distance while recounting the terrorizing of a town, the bombing of schools, and the shooting of children is a curious thing. The watercolorish animations and lack of contextual grounding may have something to do with it. The chief draw here, of course, is Malala herself: an irrepressible, earnest voice for the oppressed. 2015. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

#### Hotel Transylvania 2 — The lively

undead. Yes, that's the legendary Mel Brooks you hear lending his voice to Great-Grandpa Vlad in director Genndy Tartakovsky's sequel to his human boymeets-monster girl romantic comedy for kids, Hotel Transylvania. Maybe that explains the relentless, unending, benumbing avalanche of gags (visual and otherwise), puns, and one-liners - it's an homage, silly! Nor does it obscure the central problem: for the sake of drama, the film claims there is some legit tension between humans and monsters — as in, monsters live to scare and/or kill people. But actually, once you get past the fangs and stuff, monsters are people, too. (The real monster, don't you know, is prejudice.) This is known as having it both ways, and it's boring. With the voices of Adam Sandler, Andy Samberg, Selena Gomez, Kevin James, David Spade, Steve Buscemi, et alia. 2015. — M.L.  $\bigstar$  (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Intern - "God, I wish your expressions weren't so transparent." It's a line our internet fashion house founder (Anne Hathaway) uses, though it's not clear whether it's in reference to the 70-year-old newbie assigned to be her intern (Robert De Niro) or the seasoned actor who plays him. The solid premise - the American workforce would almost certainly benefit by looking to retirees as consultants - is given a lighter-than-usual treatment by Nancy Meyers (It's Complicated). Subplots involving Bobby D. and a children's birthday party, or joining coworkers on a digression to delete an angry email mistakenly sent by Hathaway to her mother, aren't worthy of inclusion on the Blu-ray bonus features. No sooner does De Niro sideline the boss's boozing chauffeur than it transitions into Driving Miss Hathaway. With the exception of a few galvanizing exchanges with his creditably unaffected co-star, De Niro might just as well be reciting narration. 2015. - S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

**Labyrinth of Lies (Im Labyrinth des Schweigens)** — Come for the movie, stay for the message. It's 1963, and an ambitious prosecutor – and one of the few good Germans in Naziland – thinks it time to finally alert a nation of ordersfollowing, Holocaust-denying Huns to the existence of Auschwitz Alexander Fehling (imagine a young John Wayne with Owen Wilson's nose) stars as a character based on real-life attorney general Fritz Bauer, one of the men behind Frankfurt's "Auschwitz trial," Germany's first public prosecution of Nazi war criminals. In order to get to the meat of the message, you'll first have to swallow a stock, Swastika-inscribed, party-disrupting brick; an around-in-circles romantic subplot; and at it's most sentimental, a former SS child-killer bending to give a tyke a lollipop. Not quite the searing examination of national guilt hinted at in the trailer, there's still enough uncharted inside information (albeit housed in an otherwise pedestrian presentation) to warrant interest. 2014. — S.M. ★★ (ANGELIKA FILM CENTER)

**The Last Witch Hunter** — Cursed with the long loneliness of immortality, Vin Diesel brings his olde-timey witchhunting skills into the modern world. Sadly, however, he is required to leave his magnificent olde-timey beard behind. At least Michael Caine is there to provide counsel, here trading in his butler's uniform for a priestly collar. Directed by Breck "Son of Michael" Eisner (*The Crazies*). 2015 (IN WIDE RELEASE)

**Learning to Drive** — Patricia Clarkson (*Cairo Time*) stars as a recently ditched book critic bumping up against the fact that she never learned to drive. (She had a husband for that.) Ben Kingslev (Night at the Museum Secret of the Tomb) co-stars as a recently arrived Sikh driving instructor/taxi driver who never learned to love. Together, they have so much to learn, and the operation of an automobile provides so many opportunities for metaphor. It's not Clarkson's fault that Kingsley fares so much better here: her character is called upon to emote in so many directions that she barely registers as a person, while he is allowed to operate at the level of suggestion and suppression. And it's not Kingsley's fault that Clarkson will generate all the buzz, thanks in part to some frank sex talk and in part to her graceful embodiment of the target audience. Director Isabel Coixet (Elegy) is generous in her portrayal of immigrant culture (the scenes in the Sikh temple especially) and indulgent in her depiction of memory and fantasy. 2015. — M.L. ★ (LOT; LAND-MARK HILLCREST)

#### Marshland (La isla minima) -

Slowly but steadily, a pair of case-hardened homicide detectives (Raúl Arévalo and Javier Gutiérrez) discover they have more in common with each other (and the serial killer they tenaciously pursue) than initially thought in this anythingbut-routine cop picture. Using Truman Capote's *In Cold Blood* as a touchstone, Spanish director and co-writer Alberto Rodríguez (*After, Unit 7*) puts a fresh (if seamy) spin on a genre that's long been taken for granted. Sagging storytelling devices such as bird's-eve-view cutaways and even the dreaded zoom are given powerful, plot-advancing facelifts while under Rodríguez's fastidious care. Set in the 1980s, this unsettling, politically fraught thriller leaves no topographical cavity unprodded as our ideologically opposed antiheroes use any and all means to blow the lid off the small-town pressure cooker. A rarity today in its discerning use of widescreen framing and distanced viewpoint, this one won't have the same impact via a small screen introduction, 2015. — S.M.  $\star \star \star \star \star$ (DIGITAL GYM CINEMA)

The Martian — Kids: stay in school, especially if you plan on becoming an astronaut. When a freak accident (windloosed antenna piercing bio-monitor) leads to his being stranded on the red planet, astro-botanist Matt Damon decides he ain't got time to muse on fate, the fragility of existence, or man's place in the universe. Not when there's rations to number, schedules to draw up, and basic questions of survival to be answered (in an audio diary that works nicely to provide explanatory voiceover). As he puts it, "I'm going to have to science the shit out of this," Ridley Scott's (Exodus: Gods and Kings) nuts-and-bolts answer to the existential drama of Alfonso Cuaron's Gravity works best when it keeps its camera on Damon — whose usually impervious puss actually manages to show signs of strain

And further, while you dare not look away, the looking may serve to render the horrific as commonplace. What can one person hope to do in the midst of such a struggle, especially when she finds herself reduced from elite squad leader to confused observer? Well, she can stick to her guns, literal and otherwise. Villeneuve knows this, but gets distracted by his eagerness to acknowledge the moral muck that stains us when we wrestle with monsters. **Steve Jobs** — Having treated the man who put life online — Facebook creator Mark Zuckerberg — screenwriter Aaron Sorkin now turns his attention to the man who put it into the machine. (Not for nothing is the Apple co-founder so desperate to have the Mac say "Hello" at its unveiling.) Once again, the result is not a biopic, but an opportunity for Sorkin to use a famous person as fodder for a fiction about a man who uses technology to make up for his inability to deal with life in general and people in particular. The Social Network's Zuckerberg longed for social status and an understand ing girlfriend; Steve Jobs' Jobs wants "end-to-end control," something he was denied from the very beginning, plus the freedom to never look back. Sorkin and his word-winging are the point here: the walk-and-talks and occasional flashbacks aside, director Danny Boyle has a highly structured backstage play on his hands, and it doesn't give him much room to move. And while Michael Fassbender gives Jobs an air of icy assurance in his peer-to-peer dealings, he can't quite sell the constant shifts in his relationship with daughter Lisa. Or rather, Sorkin can't. The Walk — James Marsh's Man on Wire - the superb Academy Award-winning documentary account of the death-defying stroll that high-wire artist Philippe Petit took between the Twin Towers back in 1974 — is given a fantasy thrill-ride makeover by Hollywood motion capture champion Robert Zemeckis (Flight). Saddled with a French accent, Michigan Mint-blue CG-eyes, and labored mop, Joseph Gordon-Levitt might just as well have relied on ping pong balls and a lycra suit to act the part. At best - a time lapse shows five training ropes dissolve into one as the youthful feet that cut across them gradually ripen to manhood - the special effects advance and inform the storytelling. Too often, they define it. The same vertiginous, stomach-tightening thrills that make every cent of the added IMAX/3D surcharge worth it eventually leave the audience hanging under the weight of effects overkill. For a film that takes its time, the inescapable allusion to 9/11 is splendidly summed up in one final word. ## news of the WeiRD

— In September, Tennessee attorney general Herbert Slatery concluded that records of an investigation need not be released to the Memphis City Council — because there was no comma. The law requires the records' release "only in compliance with a subpoena or an order of a court." Slatery said if there had been a comma after "subpoena," a council subpoena would get the records, but without the comma, only court subpoenas.

— In July, Andrea Cammelleri prevailed on her parking ticket challenge because there was no comma. A West Jefferson, Ohio, ordinance banned parking of any "motor vehicle camper, trailer." A state appeals judge ruled that, with a comma after "vehicle," Cammelleri's truck would have been banned, but without it, only campers and trailers were.

#### **Great Moments in Gerrymandering**

- In April, the city council of Columbia, Missouri, rigged a specially drawn "Community Improvement District" to pass a sales-tax increase. Under the law, if the district had no "residents" to vote, the "election" would be decided by the tax-friendly business owners. However, the council somehow missed that college student Jen Henderson, 23, actually lived there and had registered to vote, meaning the business owners could not vote and that the tax increase would be decided by...Henderson. (In late August, the council "postponed" the election and at press time were in a quandary, as Henderson said she's against higher taxes.)

#### The Entrepreneurial Spirit

— Spike's Tactical of Apopka, Florida, introduced its version of the AR-15 assault rifle this summer "designed to never be used by Muslim terrorists." Laser-etched on one side is a symbol of the Christian Crusades and on the other, language from Psalm 144. Spike's Tactical CEO Angela Register predicted brisk sales: "Men like to accessorize their guns more than women like to accessorize their outfits."

#### **The Continuing Crisis**

— A teenage girl in Wyandotte, Michigan, using \$9.95 tools from a website called *Fake-ABaby.com*, pretended for months to be pregnant (with abdomen extenders and ultrasound photos of her "triplets"). She received gifts, had a baby shower, joined expectant mother groups and even frightened her 16-year-old boyfriend enough that he began looking for full-time work to feed the soon-due "babies." However, the ruse fell apart in the tenth month (in August), drawing community outrage, but according to the sheriff, none of the "victims" who were fooled have come forward to press fraud charges.

#### **Cultural Diversity**

— While "Deep South" states' courts are notorious for death sentences, the "epicenter" of capital punishment in recent years has shifted to Southern California, according to a September *Slate.com* analysis. While neither Texas, Georgia, North Carolina, nor Virginia has issued a death sentence this year, Riverside County, California, has recorded seven, and since 2010, Riverside and Los Angeles County have led the nation in death-row assignments. (Ironically, of course, California rarely executes anyone; its death row has 748 residents, and no one has walked the last mile since 2006.)

- Egypt's notorious corruption apparently reached a new level of victimizing in the summer as Mariam Malak, one of the top-performing high school students in the entire country, not only failed all six of her final exams but received scores of "zero" in each. Her family, and a legion of supporters on social media, have demanded that the prime minister investigate, especially whether another student had paid to acquire Mariam's scores or whether Mariam was failed intentionally because she is of Egypt's Coptic Christian minority.

#### **Bright Ideas**

— The Cambridge, Massachusetts, company AOBiome believes we have dangerously stripped "good bacteria" from our skins via "excessive cleaning" and has introduced for sale "Mother Dirt" spray to add it back. Chemical engineer and co-founder Dave Whitlock told WBZ-TV in September that he personally has "not taken a shower in over 12 years," but instead uses his odorless bacteria-restoring mist twice a day to cover himself with helpful "dirt" that activates the "good" bacteria. The company will soon begin clinical trials to demonstrate whether Mother Dirt (which also comes in shampoo form) can additionally improve certain skin conditions.

#### **Fine Points of the Law**

— Cormega Copening, 17, and his girlfriend Brianna Denson, 16, of Fayetteville, North Carolina, are old enough to have sex ("adults," according to state law) but apparently too young to exchange nude photos. Copening was charged with five counts of "sexual exploitation" — for receiving "sexts" from Denson and having nude photos of himself on his phone (i.e., "exploiting" himself). Denson accepted a lesser sentence and is serving a tedious, restrictive probation; she had also been charged with self-exploiting. After much criticism for threatening felony charges and sex-offender registration, prosecutors offered Copening a similar tedious, restrictive probation in September.

#### Perspective

- Ten years after Hurricane Katrina left tens of thousands homeless in New Orleans and neighboring Gulf states, many of the 120,000 hastily constructed box-type trailers ordered up — and later condemned for concentrations of carcinogenic formaldehyde - by the Federal Emergency Management Agency are still being used in the U.S., though most living in them have no clue about the risk. The most recent users were oilfield workers in North Dakota boomtowns, but shady entrepreneurs had also bought trailers at FEMA auctions and sold them for tornado and flood victims - after removing FEMA's "Not For Human Habitation" stickers, according to a major investigation by Grist.org, released in August.

#### Failure to Keep a Low Profile

— Maurice Stewart, 22, on the lam since November while wanted for armed robbery in Cleveland, Ohio, was arrested in August when police spotted a man matching his description — notably, his one-of-a-kind tattoo of a semi-automatic rifle just below his right eye.

— Nearly every courthouse forces visitors to walk through a metal detector after leaving pocket contents (wallets, keys, etc.) in bins. Isaac Phillips, 24, faced several charges from a courthouse visit in August in Cincinnati because, among the items he had to remove from his pocket were a drug scale and a razor blade. After a short chase (and a Tasering), he was arrested.

#### People with Issues

— According to a divorce petition filed by Carole Mundy (and reported in the New York Post in August), her estranged husband Jeffrey Stein (a "top administrator" for New York's Nassau County District Attorney) drove her to post-traumatic stress disorder with his "lifestyle." According to the petition, Stein sometimes wore a chastity belt to work and, during sex, wore diapers and "a horse tail" (with an anal plug) and "gallop[ed]" around their home, used a litter box, had his wife "walk" him on a leash, dressed like a "sissy maid" named "Jessica," and wanted to be fed and diapered like a baby. Said Mundy's lawyer, it was "a bedroom nightmare."

#### **Can't Possibly Be True**

— An ovipositor is the organ that inserts or receives an egg (especially from parasites like bees — and that thing in *Alien*). A spokesperson from a startup firm called Primal Hardwere (in an August interview with *Vice.com*) assumes a human market for ovipositors and is now selling two hollowed-tube models at \$120 and \$130 (along with advice on creating gelatin "eggs" for insertion). The product, acknowledged the Primal Hardwere rep (to the wary interviewer), "can be...off-putting" to anyone who might not "fantasize about being the willing or unwilling host of alien beings inside them."

#### **Recurring Themes**

— More than three-fourths of civil cases filed in the busy Tucson, Arizona, federal court in 2014 — nearly 3000 in a courthouse open only about 250 days a year — were filed by one man, a prisoner named Dale Maisano, who was expressing disappointment with his health care as he serves his 15-year term for aggravated assault. Maisano said in July 2015 he was still getting little help for his valley fever, gallstones, sun sensitivity, leaky bladder, and nerve problems in his feet.

#### Update

— "We will not forget [rape victims]. We will not abandon you." So said attorney general Loretta Lynch at a September press conference along with vice president Joe Biden, announcing \$78 million in grants for testing rape kits that had been gathering dust for years around the country — except that these victims have already been "forgotten" and "abandoned" for more than five years. Biden was vice president in 2010 when Illinois was violating state law by ignoring 80 percent of its rape kits, and then in 2012 when Houston revealed it was sitting on 6663 kits (and Detroit 11,000).

#### **Least Competent Criminals**

— Pamela Downs, 45, was arrested in Kingsport, Tennessee, in July and charged with using a counterfeit \$5 bill at a gas station (a bill that was merely two photocopied sides poorly glued together, with one side upside down). Downs explained as she was being cuffed, "[A] Il these other bitches get to print money so I can too." (She told officers later that she had read "online" that "President Obama" had "made a new law" allowing people to print money if they were on a fixed income.)
