Santa Monica's Left **Hook comes to San Diego politics**

Out-of-town opposition research firm paid \$2500; cable TV buy totals \$138,740 San Diego Republican Mayor **Kevin Faulconer and his** strange bedfellows in the form of big labor Democrats appear to be counting on more than a few left-right jabs from out of town to put their convention center of Santa Monica, whose motto is "Hit 'em with the Left Hook," per the website of the company, formed two years ago.

Left Hook has gotten a total of \$259,286, \$200,000 for Internet work and the balance related to TV and cable efforts.

According to Politico, clients of the Democratic media and political strategy firm have included House



expansion and homeless relief tax over the two-thirds majority threshold in March.

Among the list of vendors on the Yes on C committee's January 23 campaign disclosure filing is a longtime Faulconer political friend and ally. Axiom Strategies of Kansas City, which has so far in 2020 been paid \$15.601 through January 18.

Additionally, Axiom subsidiary Cannon Research Group, which specializes in so-called opposition research, received \$2500 from the Measure C. Proponents.

"A firm grasp on what information is out there about your client and their opponent is one of the best tools a client can have in the arsenal," Axiom founder Jeff **Roe told the Missouri Times** o in November 2017 after buying the company. "Tom Jones and his team are expert opposition researchers who have already proven to be a benefit for our clients."

That outlay inches the predominantly hotel-funded effort closer to the \$2 million expenditure bare minimum believed necessary if it is to have a reasonable chance at winning the required twothirds vote.

Community colleges on financial life support

Another recession might spell disaster

he tiresome old story of colleges hiring adjunct professors to carry the burden of teaching is starting to come full circle. At the San Diego Community College District, cutting classes taught by adjuncts is the latest desperate strategy for healing management's self-inflicted wounds. And tutors at City College may well have been the canary in the mine.

In 2009, Rob Bush began taking classes in audio editing and production in the Radio, Television and Film department at City. He found that the editing did not come easy, so he put in long hours working by himself in the studio until he mastered techniques that he characterizes as largely "tactile." By 2011, the year he finished the program, he had become so competent that he was asked to join a small team of tutors who helped beginning students. "Eventually there were 12 students who passed their classes because of me," says Bush.

The rate of pay was \$11.25 per hour, and Bush was putting in 25 hours per week. But over time, Dean of Arts and Humanities Trudy Gerald began, with no advance notice, to reduce his and the other tutors' hours, first to 16 hours, then halving them to 8, and finally to 4.


"I could see the students needed me," says Bush, "so I worked five to six extra hours per week without pay. I love the audio program at City. It has helped many people find jobs, probably training 90 percent of the people who work in the field locally."

It is possible that, despite audits, the district's management can conceal fraud or embezzlement, because auditors often only ask management if they are aware of any fraud or misappropriation of funds. As evidence of the inherent risk of such an approach, consider the case sic and Valuation Insider, "was that trust without verification is a recipe for disaster." Cheap enough for Facebook

Backers of San Diego Republican mayor **Kevin Faulconer**'s proposed hotel tax hike to expand

the downtown convention center and pay for homeless relief programs are courting Democrats on Facebook. "Democrats, labor unions, and firefighters all agree: Measure C is a good deal for San Diego," says the first Facebook flight, which went up January 19. But the hotel-funded advocates, who have been slow to collect the multi-million-dollar war chest local political observers estimate may be needed to get the required two-

thirds vote for the tax increase, spent just \$2516 during the first six days of the run, from January 14 through January 20, on the social media platform, per Facebook's transparency website.

Hot on proponents' heels is homeless advocate **Michael McConnell**, who on January 15 personally contributed \$34,350 to his own digital advertising effort against Measure C, according to a January 16 campaign disclosure filing with the city clerk's office.

District Attorney Summer

Stephan is still carrying \$8000 in debt on her campaign books as a result of two personal loans she made her committee in 2017 and 2019, a January 21 report covering the final six months of last year. In the meanwhile, a group calling itself San Diegans Against Crime, sponsored by the San Diego Deputy District Attorneys Association, is spending \$10,000 on Facebook advertising for Escondido city councilwoman **Olga Diaz**,

according to a January 21 disclosure. Diaz is locked in a tight race against fellow Democrat **Terra Lawson-Remer** for the Third District county supervisor's seat... Yet another sign has emerged that San Diego party lines have begun to blur as Democrats continue to outregister Republicans. GOP Lincoln Club leader and fallen port commissioner **David Malcolm**, who copped a plea to conflict of interest charges and resigned in May 2003, came up with

\$5000 on December 27 for San Diego city councilwoman **Vivian Moreno**'s 2020 race for the county Democratic Central Committee. A former aide to ex-city councilman and one-time mayoral candidate **David Alvarez**, Moreno succeeded him two years ago in the Eighth District... **Corey Briggs**, running against Democratic incumbent San Diego city attorney **Mara Elliott**, has spent \$22,500 for online services from IVC Media, LLC, run by **Chad Peace**, son of ex-state senator **Steve** **Peace**, according to a January 22 disclosure filing. \$1650 went to Facebook and \$393 to Google, the statement says.

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

When is an anti-Trump march not an anti-Trump march? When it's actually just a rally for women's rights

Was the North County San Diego Women's March Rally a progressive woke-fest where fiery speakers and organized flash mobs railed against guns, sexual abuse and inequality, full of rainbow flag capes and "My body, my choice" T-shirts? Or was it a political event, an opportunity for local Democrats to lobby for votes even though the organizer refused to pay for law enforcement fees requested by the city?

The annual event, held on January 18 this year in the open area near the fountains at the Oceanside City Hall, was organized by Sue Alderson, an adjunct teacher and counselor at UCSD. (She uses Broadbent Media as the non-profit responsible for the event.) Alderson says that between 1200 and 1500 people attended the 2020 Women's March; Oceanside police estimated there were between 600 and 700. And even though the word "march" is still part of the official name of the event, Alderson says there was no march connected with the rally this year.

Oceanside police spokesman Tom Bussey reports that there were no problems with the event. Still, the city determined that five uniformed officers needed to be there, and "it costs to have officers there. I understand there were problems with the permitting, but that is not our problem." Alderson says she paid the city of Oceanside a basic \$355 fee plus \$250 for a one-day insurance policy. But the city wanted more. "This year," she says, "they decided to send me a bill for \$1500 for like five



sergeants and eight cops. I said, 'Are you serious? This is a woman's rally. We're not even having a parade. Nobody is marching. We're not closing any streets.' I told them I was not paying for it. I told them, 'You guys need to figure this out.' Seriously, we are a very, very grassroots organization. To pay \$1500 for

law enforcement is way too expensive. Oceanside was really paranoid about this, and I don't know why. I think they misread this. They thought it was just going to be an anti-Trump political rally, when it's about women and women's rights and violence against women." One city insider says the city allowed the event to proceed even though Alderson did not secure the law enforcement permit. A request for comment from city manager Deanna Lorson was not answered. Groups who supported the

permit. event included the Sally Hunt Foundation (shoes for children), Mosques Against Trafficking, and Moms Against Guns, each of which paid \$20 for the right to set up a table at the event. About 20 Democratic officeholders or candidates paid \$50 per table. Incumbents such as congressman Mike Levin and Assemblywoman Tasha Boerner Horvath had tables, as did County Supervisor hopefuls

The whistleblowing women of North County.

Besides paying for the \$355 permit and \$250 insurance policy, Alderson says the table space fees went to cover T-shirts, a DJ and a P.A. system. And free whistles. After railing against human trafficking or how violent President Trump is against women, the speaker would exhort the crowd: "There is so much going

on that pisses us off. Some things make me so mad I have to be a whistleblower," which then triggered a whistle cacophony.

Though Congressman Levin was honored for helping to turn his district blue, and there was plenty of anti-Trump sentiment expressed both on mic and via hand-drawn signs, Alder-

Terra-Lawson Remer and Olga Diaz, and 50th congressional candidate Ammar Campa-Najjar. (Levin, Diaz and Campa-Najjar appeared in person). Presidential hopefuls Elizabeth Warren and Bernie Sanders had a presence. The Democratic Clubs of Escondido and Vista and candidates for the Carlsbad, Vista and Oceanside city councils also paid for tables. son says the North County Women's March wasn't all anti-Trump or pro-Democrat. "We want to be a voice to as many community activists as we can. Every voice counts." Leea Pronovost was one of the speakers; she says if it were not for this event, she might not have had the opportunity to speak in such a public setting. Her cause, she says, is the reality that 25 transgender women of color have been murdered just for being who they were. "I wish it would have been someone of color [speaking], but because they couldn't find one, I guess I was the next in line, because of my Native-American descent." Pronovost goes by the name Two Spirit, which she says refers to both her native American roots and her dualgender identification. "I was born as a male. I cannot deny my male side, yet I can also not deny my female side." Pronovost works as a case manager for the Unicorn Homes project, which provides shelter and other assistance for homeless youth aged 14-25 and is part of Oceanside's North County LGBTQ Resource Center.

Risky railroad crossings retard routes But while they may be dumb, they may

also be legal

Del Mar officials want the trains off the bluffs. Transit officials want the people off the tracks. Neither side is succeeding, and with the number of trains increasing from 50 to 79 this year, the threat of accidents worries both. Last year, a lawsuit filed by the family of a man struck and killed as he crossed the tracks accused both the city of Del Mar and the railroads of failing to provide safe crossings such as tunnels or bridges. But as a multi-year project gets underway to stabilize the bluffs to make travel safer for trains, the only plan to make things safer for pedestrians involves more signs and stronger enforcement.

According to the North County Transit Authority, which claims the right-of-way along the 1.5 mile stretch of bluffs, trespassers were afoot during recent repair efforts. But those feet are stepping over the same sweep of tracks that locals have crossed to get to the beach for as long as anyone can remember. And before that, they say, there was a deed, which still gives them the right to cross in certain areas. "All rights North County Transit District or the railway have to the bluffs upon which the tracks lie are subject to the provisions of this deed," Tom Grindle, a Del Mar local and attorney, told the city in 2018 when the trespassing issue was heating up again. Since then, only the bluffs have changed, crumbling into the sea in six major collapses.

Trespassing reports, combined for 2018 and 2019, peaked in November: 170 incidents from Coast Blvd. all the way down the bluffs, a transit district spokesperson told the city council last week during a safety presentation. The incidents have involved as many as 50 people at one time. Most reports are filed by the train crews. Some involved fatalities: since 2015, there have been seven deaths. Then there are the near misses that have caused slowing or emergency braking: *continued on page 8*

34 since 2017. And following in the wake of every delayed train is a cascade of service disruption. The last five accidents in Del Mar held up 35 trains, annulled eight, and caused others to miss multiple stations. The district has specific numbers; 1,459 minutes of delay, 5,250 passengers disrupted.

While it may seem easy to avoid being hit, rail officials offer this warning: the trains are quiet, can travel over 50 mph, and have a wider reach beyond the rails than people realize. Further, the public lacks the training that transit employees receive. Nevertheless, the Transit District's solution — a proposal to fence off the tracks — didn't survive public outrage at the prospect of being left with only one legal crossing at 15th Street. That was when Grindle got involved.

In 1909, the city's founder, the South Coast Land Company, granted the railway the land for its tracks. They reserved the right for access to the beach over the tracks in between 10th and 11th streets, Grindle said. The deed also



"fully committed" to snuffing out the risky behavior. A draft will be released in March. Other measures include more "no trespassing" and suicide prevention signs, more training for crews on reporting criteria, and increased presence of law enforcement. The city can

allows "passageways to the ocean beach." Grindle attached the deed in a letter to the city council so they could consider using it, in court if necessary, "in pointing out to North County Transit District that it does not have the legal right to block our bluff and beach access." The council rejected the fence, instead working on more safe rail crossings.

But the "Safe Rail Trail and Pedestrian Crossing feasibility study," which brought together the city, North County Transit District, and the San Diego Association of Governments, didn't get far.

In the works now is a trespasser mitigation study by the Transit District, which is help, they say, by putting signs at all public access points to discourage trespassing, and closing off the trails from Powerhouse Park and the Highway 101 overpass bridge leading to the right-of-way.

But actual hits and close calls haven't stopped people from taking shortcuts to the beach, which deputy mayor Terry Gaasterland says are well known as a recreational area. And Robert Hajek, another local attorney, said he was anxious to argue in court on behalf of people who have been getting ticketed for crossing the tracks. "I believe this issue has to be dealt with by the city." It's a difficult one, he said, "because you have to prove you're a resident of the city to cross."

BAJA Squatter scam targets tourists Check on who's getting your check

"Everything is invaded, all homes that are foreclosed are invaded" by squatters, José Luis Padilla Gutiérrez reportedly said. "There must be about 4000 in Tijuana, and 16,000 in the state of Baja California." Padilla Gutiérrez is the president of Canadevi BC, National Chamber of Housing Development and Promotions. "It is something that CanadeviI is looking into," he reportedly said, "as there are still no housing offers, coupled with the taxes that are being raised to us right now... With less [people] that have housing — there will be more invasions. It is a very serious problem that we must attend to." Mexican news outlets are saying that many of the homes are empty due to the insufficient real estate

credit granted by Infonavit to the applicants. This despite the government website's claim that "during the current administration, Infonavit (Institute of the National Housing Fund for Workers) has granted 2,050,000 housing loans, benefiting over 7.5 million Mexicans."

Skyline resident C. Valdez saw the January 12 news about the Baja squatter influx. "It's a big problem down there, because its not regulated, really," Valdez to keep an eye on the properties. I go there to talk to the caretakers; they catch squatters in our other house all of the time. "There's also, like, subdivisions down there," Valdez added. "You know, the nice tract housing? Those are squatted in, too. My surfer buddies [from San Diego] wanted to rent our house down there, but I said it needed lots of work. Then I told them to be careful with rentals down there — even Airbnbs."

In the last couple of years, San Diegans have reportedly been scammed by squatters, to whom they pay a deposit and first month's rent on a Tijuana or Rosarito house. Then, "people seeking a nice and/or affordable [home] may find themselves in a real pickle when the true owner shows up and evicts them," says R.S., a Baja resident who advises Americans about their home rentals and purchases in Baja. "Ask the landlord to produce proof of ownership in the form of a certification issued by the local office of the *Registro Publico de la Propiedad y de Comercio* (Public Register of Property and Commerce), since that document will not

said to me on January 19. Valdez is an auto mechanic by trade; during his time off, he visits his elderly mother's properties in Tijuana and Rosarito. "She owns a couple of two-story houses down there and an apartment complex," he said. "She usually has people living in the one house for free, only establish who is the current registered owner, it will specify and list any current liens or if the property has been attached. Thus you will be able to confirm if the property is also free and clear."

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


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

Sex and violence

Grabby headline, no? Not quite as gloriously specific as "Headless Body Found in Topless Bar," but still eye-catching. And catching eyes is how you stay alive in these dread latter days of content overload. So, yes, sex and violence: we had a story with a little of both on our main drag here in La Mesa last week. Menswear resale shop owner Peter Carzis got himself caught on film twice: first, fondling a woman in front of his store, and then attacking the gaggle of reporters who showed up to ask him about it. And it was a gaggle: videos of the incident show at least six people, two of them with cameras, the rest with smartphones. If it bleeds, it leads, and if there's sex, there's rubbernecks.

"It was so weird," said one of those reporters when I spoke with him the next day. "Genuinely. As a reporter, you go out, and you're looking for..." He paused. "The store next door

said he's a great guy, really mellow. The corner store says he's a terror, sends a shiver down the back every time he walks by. So we're genuinely..." He paused again. "Maybe there's an explanation. Maybe there's something there."

Remarkably, the sight of six people with cameras outside his store did not dispose Carzis to offering said explanation. Instead, recalled the reporter, "He just comes and attacks this poor woman — grabbed her, shook her. I came running, but he's old and frail. You can't just throw him on the ground; he might really get hurt. So you're like, 'All right, just let him blow off steam." Well, not quite. Roll tape. Carzis' tirade brings some Scorsese-level rage-cursing to the show. Put Pesci's voice in your head as you read the transcript. Let's pick up where he starts stomping toward the retreating Cameraman. (I couldn't find footage of the altercation between Carzis and the woman.)

Carzis: "You think you're a badass, motherfucker? You're a badass?"

"That's right, I'm a badass," says Cameraman. "You're a badass? Show me how bad you are, motherfucker! Show me how bad you are!"

Cameraman does not show him how bad he is. He's thinking about his camera. But camera or no camera, Carzis' rage is disconcerting.

"Hey Peter! Peter, you're about to get arrested," says KUSI's Dan Plante. He sounds positively cheerful, and why not? This stuff is gold.

"Look what you just did to me," says the

woman in question. "You just pushed a woman. What do you have to say to that?"

"Oh, fuck you," says Carzis. "I say fuck all you motherfuckers." He's walking back towards his shop as he says this, throwing middle fingers behind him in an instant meme. (Yes, I'm part of the problem.)

"Really?" asks Plante, moving in close behind him.

"That's what I say," says Carzis, turning and knocking Plante's phone to the ground. "Fuck you, fuck you. Fuck you, you motherfucker." Carzis kicks at Plante. Plante kicks right back.

"Come on, gimme some more!" cries Peter, grinning wickedly. "That's all you got?"

They tussle again, and then Plante gets an idea. He takes off his glasses, and tells Carzis, "You want to hit me? Go ahead." Carzis thinks about it, laughs, and then walks this demonization of the mainstream press is really coming from right now, don't you?" he asked. "I mean, this is all filtering down, you know? You could show him screaming, saying 'motherfucker,' and throwing punches, and people would just say, 'Fake news." People like my solidarity-minded pal.

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

2920 Gate Five Place, a six-bedroom, eight-bath custom estate with nearly 9000 square feet of indoor living space sits at the end of a cul-de-sac overlooking the Upper Otay Reservoir in eastern Chula Vista.

Part of an exclusive development known as The Gates at Eastlake Woods, the home is located in the priciest and most exclusive enclave of Eastlake, a 3000-acre master-planned suburb that first broke ground in 1986. While most of the community's thou-

sands of housing units are cookie-cutter singlefamily homes crammed onto postage stamp-sized lots, luxury homes in The Gates are among the only custom-built residences found in Chula Vista's newer neighborhoods.

The Gate Five home was completed in 2004

and sits on two-thirds of an acre abutting dedicated open space in Proctor Valley, ensuring that no future development will obscure the lake views the home was built to take advantage of. According to listing materials retrieved from *Realtor.com*, the home was featured on the Tour D'Elegance, a fourweek showcase of luxury properties in The Gates that attracted more than 50,000 visitors.

Floor-to-ceiling glass is extensively employed along the home's eastern walls to take advantage of the views, while marble stone and exotic woods are used for flooring and as wall accents. The home's "exquisite upgrades" include glass doors that fully retract into exterior walls and custom-made furniture that conveys with the house and was designed specifically to fit the curved walls that dominate the home's architecture.

In addition to the prerequisite "huge gourmet kitchen," other rooms include an executive home office with wood paneling and a solid glass interior wall, a private theater with leather seating arrangements and a screen that retracts to expose a window overlooking a custom water feature, massage and steam rooms, and a master suite with its own sitting area and a dual-sided fireplace leading into the bath with oversized walk-in closet and soaking tub overlooking the lake. A grand spiral staircase leads to the second level hall with vaulted ceilings, a wall mural, and etched-glass artwork accented by recessed lighting, though the home is also equipped with its own elevator for those who prefer not to climb.

The home is "very high tech and fully automated," with an "iPhone app to control everything including alarm, lights, climate, fireplaces, windows and shades." The home also features its own water filtration system with reverse osmosis and ozone systems, and the "gorgeous copper roof" lends to the home's unique multitiered exterior profile.

Outisde, the "killer views" continue to the backyard, which is equipped with two fireplaces, an outdoor kitchen *continued on page 17*





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the holy ghost of Archie Moore

is was once the most celebrated name in boxing—"The Old Mongoose," "Ageless Archie," or simply Archie Moore, the longest-reigning light heavyweight champ.

Archie was born in Benoit Mississippi, as his mother claimed, or Collinsville, Illinois, as he said, in 1913 or 1916 (Moore was as much a master of the press as he was of his right hook.) He moved to San Diego in 1938, and died here of heart failure 60 years later. By then, he had worked his way into

the hearts of the public and become one of our city's most prominent citizens. He was the greatest puncher ever to hit this town, and his 141 official knockouts remain a world record in no danger of ever being broken.

Perhaps ironically, Moore used boxing as a way of keeping kids from violent crime, and instructing them in the power of selfdefense, education, respect, patriotism, and faith.

Beginning with President Eisenhower in the 1950s, Moore met with three sitting U.S. presidents to explain his vision that the nation was headed for what many considered absurd in clean-cut post-war America: a gang and a drug epidemic. He was so convinced of the plague's arrival, and that the twinheaded dragon could be defeated through prevention, that he founded and funded an organization he named Any Boy Can, which would eventually be renamed Anybody Can (to accommodate girls) and is now known as the ABC Youth Foundation.

Today, Archie's dream lives on through his son Billy, in a small tract home converted to a boxing gym and tutoring center

Unless you've been in the ring, you shouldn't talk, cuz you don't know how it feels to get hit. at 3130 Market Street in the San Diego neighborhood of Stockton. There, boys and girls learn selfdefense and other valuable life skills.

Within the 1200 square feet of ABC are a library, half a dozen heavy bags, nearly as many speed bags, and a boxing ring. Five mornings a week find Billy Moore - a passionate and compassionate man, a once-promising heavyweight who went the distance with former champion Tony Tubbs — battling to save the kids he loves. Moore commands the respect of the city, but nowhere more than in the ring, where he teaches the ABC concept, a manifesto first employed by his father in the mid-1950s. The foundation's mission statement sums

up the vision: "Empowering youth to step off in life with their best foot forward, without cowardice, but with courage and dignity."

ABC has proven successful in keeping its students off the streets while leading others to further success, as evidenced by their alumni graduating from such prestigious colleges as Morehouse and Yale. Many ABC kids, who range in age from 7 to 70, are what could be called "at-risk" or "latchkey," kids who have been spoon-fed on hard times. Suspicion of authority is rampant. Yet they snap to attention at Coach Moore's booming command, before he questions them concerning their dreams. One at a time, they reveal their goals and how they intend to put them into

reality. The group then recites an old-fashioned hand-on-heart pledge of allegiance.

The pledge completed, some turn to pound heavy bags while others rhythmically tap speed bags, keeping time as if using a metronome. Some eventually enter the ring to punch at the practice pads held by Coach Moore or one of his assistants: Coach Bob, Big D, Apple Bomb, or Bobo. Occasionally, fighters wearing protective gear battle it out for a few rounds. When they do, everyone watches.

A friendly, maybe holy (ABC is, after all, a faith-based organization) ghost seems to lurk within the building, channeling Archie's wisdom to children as they release emotions against leather, making that unmistakably satisfying sound. The air is thick with the smells of hard work, defeat, and victory.

Encinitas Boxing & Fitness

Dana Donahue, along with her ex-husband Tom Donahue, is the co-owner of Encinitas Boxing & Fitness. They bought the place over two decades ago when it was a racquetball facility and converted it to North County San Diego's first boxing gym. Having worked there as an instructor since the beginning, Dana has witnessed a sharp uptick in the numbers of those wanting to learn boxing. She has also observed a gender shift. "Currently, our classes are about 50 percent women."

There are daily classes for adults of all ages and for kids between



10 and 17. They all share at least one common denominator, according to Dana, "Boxing tends to attract people who don't like participating in group sports."

It is well known that the most famous name in boxing, Muhammad Ali, suffered from Parkinson's Disease, probably the result of multiple hammer fists to the head. Ali would, no doubt, approve of the Encinitas Club's "Rock Steady Boxing," which employs the sport as a way for people with Parkinson's to hold their symptoms at bay. According to Dana, "You can see the difference in patients after only a few lessons. One man who used to come in with a walker now walks in without one."

Personal trainer and boxing enthusiast Cam-

eron Trickey had this to say concerning the scientific connection between pugilism and brain function. "Boxing uses both sides of the body and sends messages to the brain that aid cognitive abilities and motor control. It is especially ben-

eficial for patients who have Parkinson's Disease."

Extreme Power

Ruben Rowell Jr. owns and operates Extreme Power Gym, a mid-sized boxing facility, and Muay Thai dojo in Oceanside. Rowell is equal parts phi-

losopher and warrior, and a firm believer in leveraging pain as a teacher. If you plan to sign up for lessons, be prepared to work. As he's being interviewed for this article, a group of pre-teen boys and girls show up for class. Without rising from his chair, he points to a practice mat and instructs them to do 400 burpees. A burpee, for those who don't know, requires dropping to push-up position, springing to the feet, and jumping.

In a scenario reminiscent of The Karate Kid, Rowell first learned martial arts in response to the bullies that regularly pounded him. Once he repaid his assailants with a well-deserved beatdown, he followed a more peaceful path, punctuated by some hard-fought battles in the ring, where he became a Muay Thai champion. He learned to stay clear of violence and ignore insults before 1986, the year he entered the Marine Corps (where his dark skin put him at odds with some individuals in his unit who were Ku Klux Klan members.)

After surviving basic training, Rowell was stationed at Camp Pendleton in Oceanside. From there, it was an hour-plus drive each day to Spud Murphy's Gym in downtown San Diego, where he has fond memories of getting black eyes and busted lips, and of pissing blood for two weeks after trading punches in the ring. According to Ruben, "Murphy's was like something out of Rocky II — there was no sign on the door, and you had to walk down several flights of stairs to get there. I'd be driving there, scared shitless the entire time, because somebody was getting knocked out cold or dropped to the canvas there every night. At times, I'd get hit so hard that everything went blurry. That's when you learn to put on your

best poker face, letting your opponent think he has given you his best shot and not hurt you.

"I don't teach kids to beat anybody up — I teach them discipline, which means doing what needs doing when you don't feel like it. Ask your mom and dad if they want to get up and go to work each day. The answer is probably no, but they do it anyway. That's discipline."

Like many masters of martial arts, Rowell does not need to prove himself through fighting. While that has its benefits in his personal life, it may have worked to his competitive disadvantage. "In my prime, I had to get hit five or six times before I'd hit back," he said.

"My dad was old school, and the nicest guy I ever knew, but

vou didn't want to cross him. He'd say, 'If someone comes after me, I won't fight them; I'll shoot their ass.' His attitude toward fighting was to avoid it. If you couldn't, it should be so serious that someone will end up in Intensive Care or the graveyard. I will never raise my fist to anyone first. When I teach hand-to-hand combat at Camp Pendleton Marine base, however, I'm not teaching fighting; I'm teaching survival and killing.

"I haven't been in a street fight since I was a kid, but I never turn my sense of awareness off. When I'm out somewhere, I size up who's the toughest guy in the place, and who's a loudmouthed bitch. If I feel the flow of the room going toward a fight, I slip out the back door. 'Big Dad,' my grandfather on my Dad's side, used to say, 'Junebug' — that was his name for me — 'most of the time, it's better to hear about a fight than to see one, because you could end up in jail, or worse.""

Heavyweight contender

In one sense, boxing is not complicated. Two people try to hit each other as often and as hard as they can. The one that hits hard enough to knock the other one out, or who scores the most significant hits, usually wins. Still, some of the details of prizefighting can be confusing to fans. For one thing, there is not one significant championship belt, but four of them: The International Boxing Federation (IBF), the World Boxing Federation (WBF), the World Boxing Organization (WBO), and the World Boxing Council (WBC.) Multiply that by 34 divisions (17 for men and 17 for women) ranging from mini flyweight (105 pounds and under) to heavyweight (200 pounds and up). It's the power blows of the heavyweights that fill the most seats.

Heavyweight boxing depends as much on personality as it does on knockout power. There is no shortage of either in this division these days. Andy Ruiz, "The Mexican Rocky;" Deontay Wilder, "The Bronze Bomber;" and Tyson Fury "The Gypsy King" have colorful fight names, their own entrance music, and entertaining backstories. In Wilder's case, there is

also a jewel-studded robe and mask he wears as he swaggers toward the ring. Perhaps that, and certainly his championship belt, have helped deflect much of the spotlight away from the cage of mixed martial arts and back into the ring.

Former Heavyweight Champion of the World George Foreman made a point about compassion when he referenced his famous Rumble in the Jungle with Muhammad Ali, saying, "The best punch of the fight was the one that was never thrown." In the eighth round, Foreman was on his way to the canvas after a combination from Ali dropped him. Ali locked and loaded for a final insurance punch, but pulled back for no explainable reason other than concern for his

opponent's well-being.

Australia-to-San Diego transplant Trent Rawlins may not be as generous as Ali in the restraint department, but he does say, "I have nothing against anyone I'm fighting. I don't want to hurt them; I simply want to win."

Rawlins, twice a champion of Australia, is a gentle, soft-spoken mountain of a man who walks around at 255 lethal pounds, much of it residing in anvil arms connected to wrecking ball fists. At 33 years old, he is getting up there for a fighter, but he has every confidence that he will one day become champion of the world. That confidence was boosted when the last man who stood in the way of his right was knocked out in round one; something

Rawlins paid for with a broken hand. When asked if he would have continued fighting if that punch hadn't knocked out his opponent, he quickly replies, "If I hadn't knocked him out with my right, I would have knocked him out with my left."

Rawlins' professional record is ten wins, two losses, and one draw. "I've learned a lot since losing those first fights, and now I'm on a roll."

"A lot of fighters in other divisions have to cut weight and can get a little agitated at their weigh-ins, because they haven't been eating. That's not a problem in my division, because it starts at 200 pounds and there is no upper limit. The biggest fighter I ever faced was 372 pounds, but it was an easy fight. He was too big and too slow. I'm 255 right now, but I like to fight between 235 and 240. The reason I'm heavier now is that I'm still recovering from my broken hand. But I've remained in pretty good shape, with around 13 percent body fat."


The fight game is littered with trash talk that Rawlins shakes off like a poorly aimed jab. "I let 'em say whatever they want, and reply, 'God bless you, but I'm going to make you pay in the ring."

Comparable to football's Monday morning quarterbacks are what Rawlins calls "boxing

cheerleaders." According to him, "They sit on the sidelines, yelling, 'This guy should throw more jabs,' or 'He's not doing enough.' But they have no idea how hard it is to get in the ring for even one minute. Anyone can hit a bag that's not hitting back. Unless you've been in the ring, you shouldn't talk, cuz you don't know how it feels to get hit. When you take a hard shot, you have to act like it doesn't bother you, all the time hoping you're fooling your opponent and he won't hit you in that same spot again. Being knocked out is different; when that happens, you don't feel anything. I've been knocked out twice. After I came to, I tried to talk the ref out of stopping the fight, but it was over.

"Boxing is called 'the sweet science,' and it is very scientific — kind of like a dangerous game of chess. I'll study my opponent beforehand, and I'll know if he's a counterpuncher, or if he likes to attack. During a fight, I notice little things like him throwing a jab and not bringing his hand back to his face. When he does that, eventually, I'm

gonna catch his jab, and come over the top, boom, with the right hand. I'm a puncher, but I can brawl, I can box, I can move."

When asked how Muhammad Ali might fare against someone like WBC Heavyweight Champion Deontay Wilder, Rawlins replies, "That's a tough one, but if Wilder landed his right hand on Ali - he, or anyone else, is going down and not getting up. I was at the fight when Wilder fought Tyson Fury, and I still don't know how Fury (the English heavyweight that battled Wilder to a draw that evening) got up after being hit like that. His eyes rolled back in his head, and he was out. It's like Wilder has a loaded gun in his hand."

Some heavyweight boxers, including Tyson Fury and former heavyweight champion Andy Ruiz, don't look particularly well conditioned. According to Rawlins, however, "They may not look it, but you have to be extremely fit to box 12 rounds. It's not a bodybuilding competition." Rawlins trains twice a day, once for two hours in the morning with Tiger Smalls. When that workout is complete, he jams to work with his wife Ashley at their law firm, Rawlins Law, where his wife is the attorney and he is the case manager. By five that evening, he is well into his conditioning workout, which consists of running on the beach or swimming.

When asked what a fighter needs to succeed, Rawlins immediately replied, "You gotta be smart, or have someone behind you who is smart. There are a lot of good fighters who have bad managers and pick the wrong fights at the wrong times — they don't listen to their bodies — they spar too much and end up being punch drunk. I don't care how talented you are or how hard you punch — you've got to be smart."

Rawlins was a gifted rugby player in Australia and went straight from his high school team into the pros. When pro rugby didn't work out, he returned home, disappointed. Concerning that time, he says, "I'm not angry now, but I was then because all my dreams had been taken away. That's when a friend suggested I try boxing. I was 19 when I went to that gym, and a trainer said, 'You've got a little bit of talent — why



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not have a fight?' I did, and I ended up having a good amateur career."

According to Rawlins, "The most recognized sporting figure when I was growing up was the Heavyweight Champion of the World. In America these days, any of the top heavyweights can walk down any street without anyone recognizing them. In Europe, however, fighters like Ruiz or Wilder would be mobbed if they tried walking down the street."

Boxing may be the sweet science, but they're not trading sugar smacks in the ring, and it's not an entirely safe endeavor. According to Rawlins, "I realize it's dangerous, and while my wife and my mom support me in fighting, I think they look forward to me retiring. If I had kids, I don't think I'd want them boxing.

"One thing I love about boxing, though, is its unpredictability. Anything can happen in the ring. No matter how far down you might be in a fight, you're just one punch away from victory."

as recent building projects, has run out of money. The proposition, along with Prop N, also bore much of the burden of funding the district's tremendous edifice complex — 36 new buildings and 18 building renovations.

At the end of the 2016-2017 fiscal year, the district's General Fund Unrestricted beginning balance from the end of the previous year was \$34,906,804. Its closing balance was \$25,388,757, the figure that became the beginning balance for 2017-2018. The closing balance for that year was \$6,565,629. The closing balance for 2019-2019 would have been a negative \$20,257,898 except that the district had raided several other funds to the tune of \$37,582,139. One of those funds was Other Post-Employment Benefits, withdrawing \$14,700,000. An additional \$22,182,139 was made available from a General Fund Unrestricted account, meaning the funds supposedly were retricted to be a reserve account.

CITY LIGHTS

The ending balance in 2018 - 2019 for the district's general fund unrestricted was \$17.3 million. However, that was after the transfer in of the \$37.6 million. If the district continues its current spending pattern, the financial balance could be in a deficit for FY 2019 - 2020 with no means to cover it. Recent revelations have shown the difficulty the City of San Diego still has in paying money back that it borrowed from its pension system in the early 2000s. The 2009 recession made the problem much worse. If another downturn in the economy should take place, the San Diego Community College District will be in an especially precarious situation. If the faculty members who were not paid on time one month several years ago thought that was bad, they might want to think about the district's financial health today.

District chancellor Constance Carrol indicated in a July 2019 email to faculty and staff that reducing classes that adjunct instructors teach will be the road to recovery. In fact, now that would be about the only way out.

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

Dip the saucer

ittle India. Black Mountain Road. Looking for an Indian grocery outlet. Gotta find my new favorite flavor to swipe on bread.

Marmite. Surprise for my friend Annie. She's Scottish. She let me try some of hers. It has a beefy flavor. So I'm looking, looking. Pass by a place called Chennai Tiffins. Chennai? Ancient city on the east coast of India. Used to be called Madras. Old? Has been

populated the last, oh, 250,000 years. Hmm. I just might come back for, well, tiffin. Tiffin's what the Indians of India call light

lunch, or a savory afternoon tea. As it happens, right now would be perfect timing for tiffin. Around two.

Except I'm still looking for this grocery outlet, Akshar Cash 'N' Carry. I dodge around car wrecks at "Ability Auto Body & Paint," and hey, now I spot a place hidden in the corner called "San Idli."

"San Idli?" I ask the guy, Natrajan.

"It means 'San Diego Idli.' We are famous for idli."

Huh. Idli. Now he's got my curiosity going.

"Yes," he says. "South Indian food. I am from Telangana, the 29th state in India. Vegetarian. Please."

He motions me in. Some Indian businessmen, looks like, are nearing the end of their meal. Turns out lunch is over in twenty minutes, 2:30. Cook's cleaning up a steaming hot plate in the open kitchen. Natrajan shows me the menu. Hmm. I'm not so up as I should be on Indian cuisine. I know they have their own Mason-Dixon Line, gastronomically speaking. If you wanna break down the difference between northern and southern Indian food, north is meat and bread, south is vegetarian and rice. That's it. Plus north: lots of yogurt and cream; south, coconut milk.



So, here we're looking at southern cookin' all the way. Lot of new words to take in. Thank goodness Natrajan's hovering. (Sneak check shows

> "Natrajan" means "King of Dance." It's all about Shiva. I think Natrajan's dancing a little because in fifteen minutes, they're outta here.) First up is vada. Two for \$5.99. "They're like fritters, cutlets, doughnuts, dumplings," says

Natrajan. Or for \$4.99, they have sambar vada. "A lentil-based veggie stew," says Natrajan.

Oh man. This is a long list of stuff I know nothing about. Only item I recognize is

samosa, the triangular fried pastry pockets of veggies or meat for \$1.99 each. But mirchi bhaji (two for \$3.99)? Papad chat (two for \$2.99)? It's all French to me. And hey, four items down, 50 to go on the menu

One word I do notice coming up a lot is this "Idli." Like "mini sambar idli" gives you ten for \$5.99. Sounds like good value, but ten what?

"Idli are lentil-rice cakes," says Tea, Indian-style Natrajan. "Very popular for breakfast with sambar, the soup, or chutneys."

> In the end I retreat to the part that says "Weekday lunch special (11 am-2:30 pm)." So for \$11.99, you get one of four kinds of rice (lemon, tamarind, sambar, or curd), a mini masala dosa (this I remember: a big, thin, rolled crepe with potato inside), or mini vegetable uthapam ("a thicker dosa," says Natrajan), plus "idli, sambar, pickle, papad, chutney, dessert."

"I'll take it," I say, because we're seriously running out of time.

The round tray has the sambar (I chose it because it's the spiciest) with steaming flavored rice in the middle, the dosa (thank goodness it's the mini version. Full-size is like an umbrella), the sambar veggie soup, a bowl of coconut milk chutney, a crispy chickpea papadum, and a little bowl of biting raw green mango

pickle. So this must all be good for you, right? Vegetarian, slightly spicy, all fresh-cooked?

Natrajan says the name of the game is dipping, and pouring over. So I start off with the dosa and dunk it into the *sambar* soup. Get a nice umami flavor from the mash inside, and specially when I add a chunk of mango pickle. But the best flavors come when you pour the sambar over the spicy rice, and then add a pour of the coconut chutney, then take a crackling chomp of the chickpea papad. Then a slurp of tea (I got me one, \$2.99. Mmm. Rich flavors — cardamom? — and hey, India is where tea comes from, so it should be interesting). Whatever, what a combo!

Oh, and hidden beneath the dosa, this restaurant's namesake, an actual idli. Like a mini flying saucer of compressed lentil-rice just waiting to be dipped.

Lunch special. Includes rolled dosa (left), and that's the mini size

says idli cakes are made by steaming the batter of fermented black lentils and rice. I know fermentation is great because it breaks

Natrajan

down starches and makes them easy to digest. Idli are supposed to be incredibly good for you.

"Save the *rava kesari* till last!" says Natrajan as he starts closing up. He's pointing at what looks like a blob of sticky rice. Turns out it's semolina, yellow - "kesari" means "saffron" - and it's really sweet. And OMG, it goes with this tea like a horse and carriage.

So value for money? Oh yes. How actually healthy it all is? Jury's still out. Heckuvalot of fried stuff, boiled stuff, not much sign of green stuff. But this vast, ancient cuisine, it is completely vegetarian. That's a lot of eaters voting with their mouths.

I do finally find my Marmite, at Akshar Cash 'N' Carry. Just around the corner. "I wouldn't

show it at the restaurant," says Annie when I call. "Why not?"

"It's made from beef, you dingbat."

Babycakes; 3795 Fourth Ave, Hillcrest. A couple of years ago, after a decade doing business in

Hillcrest, fancy cupcake maker Babycakes moved out of its 5th Street home base to pursue a bigger bakery opportunity in Paradise

Hills, near National City. I don't know whether the loss of a cake-maker can be said to leave a hole in a neighborhood, but the collective weight loss surely made

some kind of a dent.

Either way, it has to be considered good news that, a few weeks ago now, Babycakes made good on hints it would someday return to Hillcrest, opening a new bakery counter at 4th and Robinson, in what used to be a Pinkberry. So if you had the cupcake trend outlasting the frozen yogurt trend, congratu-

> lations! Buy yourself a cupcake. Judging by the crystal chandeliers hung in the new shop, it's fancy enough to represent its sig-


nature cupcakes. As to what makes them fancy, one could easily cite the tall swirls of frosting and generous application

of sprinkles topping them, but the truth is you've got

to look, and bite, a little deeper.

For example, at first glance its namesake Babycakes cupcake looks like a flashy yet simple white cupcake with white frosting and rainbow sprinkles. But in truth, it's made with marble cake, cheesecake frosting, and a dollop of cheesecake and chocolate chips buried in its center. The chocoholic cupcake has chocolate cake with chocolate mousse frosting to go with a mousse-filled center, topped with chocolate sprinkles and drizzle. These are just the beginning,

it gets more tantalizing from there, incorporating frostings made from fudge or butter cream, and centers enriched by raspberry sauce, peanut butter cream, Oreo crumbles, and more. There are cupcakes based on carrot cake, German chocolate, and a bright green one highlighting pistachios. Even the vegan take on its salted caramel proved better and moister than most mortal cupcakes.

The new Babycakes doesn't try to incorporate sandwiches and other fare the way the old restaurant did; this time the focus is clearly on cakes of all sizes, but especially small ones. Along with coffee and tea. by Ian Anderson

Simsim Outstanding Shawarma a hit in Carmel Mountain Ranch

Simsim Outstanding Shawarma Carmel Mountain; 11640 Carmel Mountain Road suite 124, Carmel Mountain. From a food lover's perspective at least, good things have been happening in Carmel Mountain Ranch. Frankly, I ignored the place for years, because this is shopping center country, the sort of place populated by big box stores and other national retailers. It's the place to go if you're looking for the likes of Costco, Best Buy, Staples, and Home Depot.

Likewise, its corresponding dining options have long fallen to national chains: Panera Bread, Chik-Fil-A, Olive Garden, and California Pizza Kitchen do business here. No judgment on area residents who happily keep such places afloat, but for us of the food writer ilk, such places are *propina non grata*. Not worth patronizing when there are local eateries in the vicinity.

Fortunately, local spots have been starting to creep in. Mostra Coffee, recently named 2020 Micro Roaster of the Year by *Roast Magazine*, opened its coffee shop here in 2018. There's family-owned Sushi Kyodai, the hot dog shack Duff's Doggz, and as of a few weeks ago, a Simsim Outstanding Shawarma.

It may be telling that I found a bunch of locals lining up to eat at this new chain on the block. Simsim isn't a big national brand that serves virtually identical, trucked-in food at locations in Dubuque, Houston, or suburban New Jersey. Simsim's a San Diego startup, and this is only its second restaurant. More to the point, the Middle Eastern fast casual spot is dedicated to cooking food from scratch. I spotted chef and partner Ibrahim Alsharief working the open kitchen, just as I did when I visited the original Kearny Mesa location last August. The layout of this property is nearly identical: a cafeteria-style counter serving a stylish yet casual dining room. The biggest difference here is the long dining patio.

There are a few differences to the menu here as well. The basics are the same: wraps, bowls, and salads are made with an 18-spice rotisserie chicken, beef and lamb gyro, or falafel. But the A lamb and beef kebab plate, with salad and hummus with chickpeas

kitchen must be a bit bigger here, because there's a Carmel Mountain-specific section of the menu offering plates with kabobs and the like.

Any one of them would have been terrific with the house tahini (my preferred sauce of the six available). I decide to give the beef and lamb kebab meat a try (\$14). It's really a long, finely ground patty of grilled meat, a bit like a spicy hamburger patty. With a salad

and creamy hummus with chickpea topping, it makes a tasty, affordable meal, but I have to admit, I should have spent \$16 for the organic, tenderloin steak tikka!

I'll surely be back for it next time I'm hungry in Carmel Mountain; two months in, it's already the best sitdown restaurant in a nearly two-mile radius.

Mikami **Revolving Sushi** serves instant gratification

Mikami Revolving Sushi; 7319 Clairemont Mesa Blvd, Kearny Mesa. There's a snazzy looking new sushi restaurant in Kearny

Mesa, one that employs early 20th century technology to serve its customers. Mikami Revolving Sushi serves kaiten sushi, better known in the U.S as conveyor belt sushi. Which is pretty much your standard sushi, just delivered to your table on a conveyor belt. I

think most people are familiar the concept: the belt runs in an endless loop, so that there are always small plates of fish passing by, within arm's reach, so that when you see something

you like, you just grab that plate and commence eating.

Fans of instant gratification will appreciate the efficiency. You grab one thing you like, then another and another, and then when you've had your fill, your server counts the stack of empty plates at your table and tallies a bill; in this case charging \$2.80 per plate.

Those who think conveyor

belt sushi is mainly an attempt to coax some fun out of secondrate fish... well, there's an argument to be made there. The fish at Mikami isn't terrible, but it's not great either. It's more the equivalent of the fish you'll find at a fast-food poke bowl spot than anything a master sushi chef would serve. You won't enjoy the sublime raw fish bites of an upscale sushi bar, but you'll pay less than half the price. Which brings me back to the

now 60-year established novelty of that conveyor belt. Mikami has several conveyor belts running their circuits between long rows of booth seating, and there's admittedly a feeling of suspense watching the plate you want (two pieces of nigiri, or 3-4 slices of maki roll) as it circles around the bend and slowly makes its way toward your grabby hands.

However, I'm more enamored of Mikami's second mode of conveyance, which employs early 21st century technology to get you the sushi you desire. All the booths are equipped with touchscreen tablets, and running between them, parallel to the conveyor belt's path, is a crude monorail leading straight to the kitchen. When you order a piece of sushi using the touchscreen, a chef in the kitchen quickly prepares it,

then loads

it onto a small train car, which zooms along the rail to your

party positioned further up the conveyor belt's path keeps snagging all the uni, you can dial up your own for delivery by train. There are plenty of hot

plates and "fish buckets" served this way (these mostly cost \$7 and up), though the best use I found was dialing up a couple of hand rolls: spicy tuna in the traditional nori wrapper, and spicy yellowtail in a cone of sesame seed studded rice paper. Like most of the stuff here,

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

necessarily an improvement. Eating here provides a relatively cheap and social experience, and if you do it right you can really drag out your meal, perhaps finding a fish that stands out (on this day, it was the salmon). Of course, you can just start grabbing everything you see and gorge yourself like you never imagined. Items I spotted on that belt included chunks of melon, slices of cheesecake, sesame balls, and a small glass of apple juice.

But keep watching that belt. Mikami just opened in November, and may yet find other fun morsels to send our way. by Ian Anderson

Neff Coffee, a roaster on the go

While exercising my dog last week, I found San Diego's newest coffee roaster; or should I say the coffee roaster found me? Neff Coffee Roasters isn't San Diego's first coffee truck, but it is the first we've seen that actually roasts its coffee right there on the vehicle.

The namesake operators of the truck are David and Matthew Neff, a father-and-son duo who decided to turn son Matt's coffee roasting hobby into a business that doubles as a chance to spend time together. With permission from the parks and recreation department, they set up shop some mornings in the parking lot of Grape Street Dog Park. That's where I

found them, exactly during that part of the morning I'm usually there and starting to crave my daily cup.

Since first hitting the road in December, they've served coffee beside the main lifeguard tower in Ocean Beach, and the San Diego Holiday Half Marathon. The Neffs plan to operate up to six days a week, and will likely lock into regular rotations as they pinpoint places that need coffee service. The best way to keep track of daily locations and events is monitoring their Instagram account.

They've tricked out their mobile coffee operation so a side panel swings up to provide shade structure over the ordering window, and with built-in audio speakers that play music while you wait. But the most important built-in here is the Sonofresco fluid bed coffee roaster installed in the center of the truck, which draws propane power from a tank affixed to the bottom of the truck, and vents out the top of the vehicle.

Cooking two pound batches, they've created a "Neff blend" of Guatemala, Ethiopia, and Sumatra-sourced beans. The light-medium roast drinks plenty chocolaty in my 16-ounce order of cold brew (\$3.95), and reveals a smooth, earthy, and slightly nutty character in a cup of drip coffee (\$2.45). The Neffs offer a

full line-up of espresso drinks, including rotating specials such as a s'mores latte, and provides hot chocolate for the kids.

They'll sell you a bag of beans, whether you go for the blend or request any of its components as a single origin. If you like, you can even have them roast beans on the spot - though it takes about 15-20 minutes, and you'll want to let the beans rest five days to a week before brewing for best results. Buying a pre-roasted bag is easier, but then, you don't get to see the beans hop about through the plexiglass window of its truck-mounted coffee roaster.

Armin van Buuren pre-dates "rave safe" lists.

Not raves anymore M. Hernandez scoffed when he saw the "rave safe with these 10 essentials" list posted on the iEDM site last summer.

Hernandez, now in his 40s, is prepping to watch EDM veteran-Armin Van Buuren at SOMA on Feb. 5. "Ear plugs and hand

sanitizer," he said of the 2020 raver's list, "these kids are afraid of loud music and germs - times have changed."

Hernandez is an old school 1990s raver who used to obtain hints of then-raves - or what we called underground parties — via a "piece of paper in a plastic Easter egg," or through secret code in America Online private chat rooms. Back then, raves were exclusive to the few that made it past the multiple San Diego County map-points placed to "shake off the tails."


"Law enforcement was always trying to bust us," Hernandez said. "We were simply: hugging, rolling" — using ecstasy — "and dancing. It was about PLUR," (Peace, love, unity, and respect.) "Why'd you Google that

raver list?" I asked him. "I wanted to be brought

up to speed," Hernandez responded, "I don't want to look out of place at Armin's concert next month. Besides, I don't think they call these legit EDM concerts raves anymore."

"Just chill on the binkies, candy beads and super-oversized Dickies," I advised him,

"and you should be OK." ".... and the Vicks Vapo-Rub," he added.

Van Buuren gained notoriety in '97 with his saw wave infused-trance jam, titled "Blue Fear." Then in '99, while many on the world wide web speculated about the Y2K computer crash, we were instant messaging one another about the Dutch-DI's "Communication" song that just dropped. It's a 135-bass-beats per minute and vocalless-song that guided some of us into the proverbial state of trance when its bass disappeared from the track, and the acoustic piano solo backed with space age-esque rhythms, ensued.

"That whole space age

feel was what I felt listening to Armin's older progressive trance," Hernandez said of the subgenre of electronica music that morphed from the techno, house, and new age music — within Europe and India in the early to mid '90s.

"Even the rave fliers had that space age vibe."

"I still have those old rave fliers," I responded, "one with Van Buuren headlining."

"We didn't have these 'rave safe' reminders, nor rave-app updates, back then transmitting to us," Hernandez said as he pulled out his iPhone. "When raves became sorta legit, we had paper fliers that those guys and gals designed on their translucent

[Apple G3 iMac] computers. Them graphic designers were overlooked, and are the real-MVPs of the scene back then," Hernandez said, "their edgy designs united us ravers and DIs."

Fast-forward to 2020 where Van Buuren's still ragin' with the youngsters at club events and what we now call "music festivals." He's pulled 394 million views and counting on his 2018 YouTube video of Blah Blah Blah: a hard/psytrance track backed with Van Buuren's signature piano playing, and lead via kiddie-sounding vocals that go: All we ever hear from you is blah

Our last show with

Anastasya "One side will have all our dream pop songs, and the other has our gothy nasty '80s songs," says Belladon's Aimee Jacobs of the band's upcoming *Dreaming/Dreading* EP. "Both sides will have a collection of four songs. We really wanted to bring out the extremes of moods and temperaments we all go through by categorizing the songs this way."

Nominated Best New Artist at the 2018 San Diego Music Awards, Belladon features Jacobs (Strawberry Moons, Burning of Rome), Heather Nation (Meadow), Alex Bravo, Billy Petty, and Anastasya Karol.

The double EP — tracked and mixed in Kensington by Ben Moore at Singing Serpent — makes its debut at the Music Box on January 30, where attendees will receive a private download code. "We'll be doing a public digital release probably a month or so after the private one," says Jacobs. Local funk band Moans will open, followed by the prog-inclined Le Ra, whose members are spread out among Los Angeles, San Diego, and Tijuana. "They sound like Portishead had a baby with PJ Harvey in Mexico. Our sister band Fistfights with Wolves is closing the night, we share two members with Fistfights, and our bass player is

AmbassadorLoungeSD 619-523-2000 also in Moans."

"There are a lot of reasons to come to this show rather than other things going on in town. This won't be your average garage rock band in outdated goth garb or a band that uses backing tracks like people don't matter. Don't get me wrong, I'm not a purest, there are times to implement technology, have a dirty sound, or write a sad song. But there is a lack of diversity here, and this event really showcases a wide range of talented, creative, good people who give a lot of fuck about what they do."

The band will perform both sides of the EP, possibly for the only time with its recorded studio lineup. "One thing that might be a little shocking to people who know us is this will be our last show with Anastasya, our other keyboardist and lead vocalist. It's a peaceful separation, she's one of my closest friends. We both started training in classical piano three years ago, right around the time I started the project, and we've grown so much as players since that time. We just grew into ourselves as musicians and

realized we wanted different things. This show really is the end and beginning of a two eras for Belladon."


Asked about the worst gig of their initial three-year era, Jacobs recalls "We had to do an acoustic set for this industry festival. Firstly, we aren't an acoustic band, so that was kind of weird for me. But secondly, it felt like we were trapped in a Black Mirror episode. The guy interviewing the bands after performances was so offensive and disrespectful. I actually went backstage while another band was performing and told him to only ask us questions that pertained to the music. His response was hilarious. He told me that people lose interest if you ask generic questions, and there are lots of interview personalities that are similar in their media personas."

FESTIVAL OF NEW TRUMPET MUSIC at Quartyard

Running February 2 through 8, the Festival of New Trumpet Music (FONT) West celebrates emerging and established trumpeters at UCSD Extension La Jolla. The festival begins with a free afternoon concert at the Quartyard, featuring bands led by two area trumpeters, San Diego-based Curtis Taylor and Ensenada's Ivan Trujillo. The Grammy Award-winning Taylor relocated to San Diego from NYC/New Jersey in late 2013, after visiting the city to record singer Mimi Klein's debut album with UCSD professor Kamau Kenyatta (who also recruited Taylor for singer Gregory Porter's Grammy-winning album

Liquid Spirits). Taylor and his quartet will play the music from his 2019 release Snapshot, a collection of jazz standards and Taylor's own compositions recorded live at the World Stage in L.A and featuring San Diego pianist Hugo Suarez alongside L.A. bassist Ben Shepherd and drummer Gene Coye. Ivan Trujillo's La Covacha Big Band, founded in 2013, makes its U.S. debut in this concert. The 11-piece group's repertoire spans a wide spectrum of jazz, sampling everything from Ellington and Basie to electronica and contemporary music. The program will focus on the original compositions of trumpeter Trujillo.



The Symphony's Beethoven is...

I take no pleasure in what follows.

The San Diego Symphony has now given two perplexing performances of a Beethoven symphony in as many weeks. The fourth symphony was on the weekend of January 17-19 and now the fifth symphony on Saturday, January 18. This makes three such performances if we go back to last season's opening concert, which included a messy Beethoven Symphony No. 7. All were conducted by Edo de Waart.

To my great chagrin, I was unable to attend the performances of Beethoven's *Symphony No. 3*, which were conducted San Diego Symphony music director Rafael Payare. I am curious about whether or not Payare was able to draw any rhthymic integrity from the orchestra.

The performance of Beethoven's *Symphony No.* 5 on Saturday was full of phrases which were unsustained, ambiguous and



Tricky Irish

"All their wars are merry and all their songs are sad."

K. Chesterton, in his poem *The Ballad of the White Horse*, famously wrote that "The great Gaels of Ireland are the men that God made mad, For all their wars are merry and all their songs are sad." That might help to account for the feeling of Steven Dietz's *Bloomsday*, which finishes its run at North Coast Rep this weekend. The promo copy understand-

ably uses the words "winsome" and "lyrical" to describe the play's story about Robbie, a young American man visiting Dublin

because his girlfriend has broken up with him just before their planned trip to London, and Cathleen, an Irish lass who is leading a tour that traces the wanderings of the central character in James Joyce's novel *Ulysses*. And the Rep's featured quotes from other critics call the production "whimsical" and "charming" — again, understandably.

Given all that, it might come as some surprise to learn in the early going that the man is beset by a profound interior coldness that winds up haunting him throughout his life, while the woman is terrified that she will end up following her mother into the madhouse, on account of the way time slips out of place for her. It's a neat trick to sing such a sad song and still get people use such cheerful adjectives to describe it, especially when the play opens with, and depends

on throughout, just the sort of time slippage that portends doom for our heroine. Robbie — or rather Rob, as his 55-year old self is known — arrives on stage and asks us to really look at, to really *see*, 20-year old Catherine, who is soon to meet his own younger self. But he's not here on a stroll down memory lane, observing what is to become his defining day (he's gone on to

become a teacher of *Ulysses*, and while he doesn't love the book, he knows it by heart). Instead, he is, impossibly, a participant,

and wastes no time in engaging Catherine in conversation and telling her things about her future meeting with him — *even though he knows this is what terrifies her*. (How does he know? Because she'll tell his younger self later that day.)

It's something of a nightmare scenario. But it doesn't feel like it, because that's not how the actors play it, and their performances are, strangely, both breezy enough and strong enough to keep the horror and heartbreak from sinking in. The song they sing is upbeat and quick-tempo, delicate and playful. When, later on, grown-up Cait (as she comes to be called) meets up with young Robbie, she shrugs that "it used to trouble me, the shifting," before noting with pleasure that "you and I at these ages are a pretty good fit." She has a point: Robbie is no fan of the future, since his previous girl ditched him when she decided

that he wasn't serious enough about it, and Cait has finally made peace with her deeply painful past, starting with the day she found and then lost him. (Besides accepting her great sorrow, she has also found places to put her beloved dead, so that they cannot unsettle her. Mad Ma is in a chair by the south window; Angry Dad is safely behind a door.)

And so it goes: Rob meets Cathleen, Robbie meets Rob, Cait meets Robbie, Cait meets Cathleen, Robbie meets Cathleen, and finally, Rob meets Cait. The youngsters are surprised to interact with their older selves, even incredulous. But they never pause in acting out the drama just as Rob and Cait remember it, and they're never so thrown that the music skips a beat. Not even when Robbie's trouble with the future bumps up against Catherine's tendency to time shift.

The play's title is taken from Dublin's annual celebration of Joyce's novel on the day when it is set, June 16, and Ulysses makes its way into the proceedings in various places and in various ways - including the bittersweet ending. Rob declares that he would keep seven words out of the book's many thousands, spoken by a dead man being lowered into his grave: "Wait. I wanted to. I haven't yet." "It's all right there," he concludes, wistfully. (Another w to slip in alongside "winsome" and "whimsical.") "What's done is done," answers Cait. "Best not to think about it." But the music doesn't end on that pat conclusion, not quite. Instead, the final note hangs in the air, as if defying both the sad past and inevitable future. A neat trick.

Created Equal: Justice in the making

pectacles, or no spectacles? That is the question that opens Created Equal: Clarence Thomas in His Own Words. (Thomas settled upon two eyes instead of four.) The next voice you hear is that of writer and director Michael Pack, pummelling his subject with another hard-hitting

brain-picker, "How did you decide you wanted to become a lawyer?"

MOVIES

One of the most controversial political subjects of his generation is thus afforded an unduly sympathetic portrait — but how else would Pack have been able to get Thomas to sit still long enough for the interview portion of our program?

Given the events of the past three years, it's even money that our country isn't any less racist or sexist today than when Thomas was elected to the Supreme Court in 1991. (Listen to the way Sen. Howell Heflin of Alabama puts a scooch too much effort into punching the second syllable in "enigma.") Even when speaking extemporaneously, much of Thomas' narration sounds like he's reading from his autobiography. But he learned about vocal clarity the hard way. He entered seminary as a high school sophomore, where it was suggested by the Dean of studies that if he wanted to succeed in a white man's world, he'd have to do something about the way he spoke. Thomas put time and effort into adopting perfect enunciation. That said, when discussing whether the libertarian philosophy of the author of The Fountainhead had an influence on Thomas' life, both director and subject refer to her as "Ann Rand."

Thomas was bothered by the Catholic Church's unwillingness to speak up against racism in America. Hearing a seminarian express relief over the assassination of Martin Luther King was the tipping point. Turning his back on so-called Men of God, Thomas traded in Catholicism for combating racism. The photo caption in his yearbook read, "Blew that test, only a 98." Fully expecting to be treated as an inferior, Thomas reasoned that if he was going to "force someone to have to discriminate against me," he needed those extra two points. That way, his detractors would be left with nothing but race to call him out on.

The only job offer dangled upon graduating Yale was from the Attorney General of Missouri, John Claggett Danforth. Cook him sweet or cook him sour, in the eyes of the then-lefty Thomas, a Republican was a Republican, and the very thought of working for a member of the GOP was hateful. Moving that minor detail to the side, he had little choice but to assume the position as an Associate AG. But by the time he was 32, a

newspaper described

Thomas of being opposed to everything from minimum wage law to affirmative action, and mused, "How a black man can say no to these policies is a mystery to most black people." For many, he was Reagan's token negro, while others accused Thomas of winning the Supreme Court nomination based solely on the color of his skin. In Thomas' own eyes, the biggest roadblock on his path to success was "the modern-day liberal."

America's prurient nature was given a zetz when Thomas' Supreme Court confirmation hearings transmogrified into a circus sideshow, thanks to sexual harassment allegations leveled against him by a subordinate, attorney Anita Hill. Her compelling public testimony was a ratings grabber that introduced viewers to the once-deemed graphic and eternally rambling query, "Who put pubic hair on my Coke?" In the end, Thomas remained firm in his belief that a black woman had lied before the Supreme Court for no other reason than to deny a black conservative from obtaining a seat. His appointment was later confirmed by a margin of 52-48.

Situated at opposite ends of the political spectrum as we may be - I believe Anita then and now - my sworn duty is to review the film, not the man. The supervening two hours revealed not so much a documentary as a call-and-response oral history; talking head closeups of Thomas seated in a studio, directly addressing the camera are divvied up between diagrammatic file footage and the occasional appearance by Virginia Thomas, wife of the Associate Justice and the film's only other interview subject. There's much to learn about the subject here, and little about the medium. This is one PBS production that never should have left the small screen.

Ford v Ferrari — Come for the metal, stay for the mettle. Because as only American-to-win-LeMans Carroll Shelby (Matt Damon) tells you at the outset, once you get your snarling, straining beast of a race car up over 7000 rpms, you go to the Race Place, where everything fades away and you're left with the question — the only one that matters, mind you — "Who are vou?" Well, if vou're autophile and superdriver Ken Miles (Christian Bale, skinny and sweet), you're the hero, the man of artistic vision and unsullied integrity (plus impatience with those who lack it) who is all but doomed in this rotten world. If you're Henry Ford II, you're the thin-skinned titan of industry who needs a genius if he's going to stick it to that painfully successful Eurosnob Enzo Ferrari. And if you're Carroll Shelby, you're the guy who has to get the Man and the Money Man to cooperate, despite the best efforts of corporate snake Leo Beebe. Director James Mangold indulges himself with this tale of American manhood (152 minutes and an awful lot of auto racing), but he knows he can afford it - he's got Bourne and Batman as brilliant, brawling best buds battling the bastards. Think Iron Man and Captain America, only it's a (mostly) true story and what's at stake is not the fate of the universe, nor even an auto race, but the glorious, endless pursuit of perfection. 2019. — M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Gentlemen — Agreeably profane caper comedy from Guy Ritchie (Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels, Snatch) a man who tosses off the c-word as casually as you or I would sound asking a dinner companion to pass the salt. Matthew McConaughev stars as an American expatriate pot farmer in England, minding his own business until the day said business - a green house responsible for 50 tons of weed a year — is knocked off by a band of tossers as interested in posting a video of their work on YouTube as they are in counting their earnings. (All this could have been prevented had the imperceivable shipping container that fronts the lab been supplied with a padlock.) Telegraphing dialogue, Tarantino-speak tributes, and a third act plot logjam are tantamount to bringing ants to the picnic, but there's enough repellent on board so as not to bother or distract too much. A Hidden Life — Once upon a time, there lived in a valley above the clouds a young Austrian couple, secure in their beliefs that fascism would never reach them. The fact-based story of a conscientious objector who refused to fight alongside the Nazis - villagers turn against the #NeverHitler for not returning their salute — is dragged across the screen for what seems an eternity by Terrence Malick. With Harvey Weinstein committing career hara-kiri, one hoped that along with his merited banishment went the annual year-end attempt to drag the Holocaust through the Hollywood cesspool trawling for Oscar. What therefore Harvey hath joined together, let not Malick put asun der. After three introductory minutes of file footage featuring Hitler, an intertitle appears to inform us that the story that we are about to see is based on truth. Words have never been Malick's strong suit, but in case the viewer finds what the characters say to be simplistic, consider his use of 'Scope. One stinkin' fisheye lens! It's like watching bow tie pasta for 174 minutes. 2019. – S.M. • (DIGITAL GYM CINEMA)

Just Mercy — Alabama logging worker Walter McMillian (Jamie Foxx) looks skyward towards the gap left by a recently felled tree, never dreaming of the hole in his life this foreshadowing shot would come to represent. McMillian fit the M.O. of a scapegoat, and he was wrongfully sentenced to death for killing Ronda Morrison, an 18-year-old white dry-cleaning clerk. His case was appealed and overturned, thanks to crusading defense attorney (and founder of the Equal Justice Initiative) Bryan Stevenson (Michael B. Jordan). It's good acting at its finest in this preaching to the choir "right to life" drama that might have worked had the filmmak ers chosen to show the audience a little mercy by not constantly talking down to them. And whatever became of Morrison's murderer? The closing crawls inform audiences as to the whereabouts of several of the film's wrongfully condemned characters. Call it a case

of selective compassion, but I had to Google the victim's name to learn that her killer has yet to be brought to justice. Directed and co-written by Destin Daniel Cretton. 2019. — S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Last Full Measure — A hot shot Pentagon worker (Sebastian Stan) gets in the line of fire of a persistent Vietnam vet (William Hurt) who, after 34 years of trying, has yet to persuade the government to award a posthumous Medal of Honor to the gallant pararescuemen who saved the lives of 60 soldiers. It's through the eyewitness testimony of the survivors that we get to know Airman William "Pits" Pitsenbarger (Jeremy Irvine), Writerdirector Todd Robinson wisely stacks his deck of persevering comrades with a cast of celluloid bluebloods. Joining Hurt are Christopher Plummer, Samuel L. Jackson, Ed Harris, Amy Madigan, John Savage, and Peter Fonda, signing off in style with this, his last performance. The only star who doesn't get to shine is Diane Ladd. Alas, war movies are hell on female characters. Not bad for a regulation military movie, but I must confess to a wandering attention span; how else could I notice the cigarette that Jackson removes from the pack of Marlboros is an American Spirit? 2019. — S.M. ★★ (IN WIDE RELÊASE)

Like a Boss — It's Celebrity Apprentice meets Abbott and Costello when an orange-haired billionairess (Salma Hayek) bankrolls a pair of makeup artists (Rose Byrne and Tiffany Haddish), only to landmine their thruway to success with seemingly insurmountable tasks in the hope of gaining control of their company. It's hard to believe that a filmmaker as in tune with human idiosyncrasies as Miguel Arteta could ever sign off on something as carelessly conceived and executed as this variation on a Seth Rogen role-reversal (vagina jokes replace penis jokes) stoner comedy. Arteta is, in Golden Age of Hollywood parlance, a "woman's director," and it was encouraging to see several repeat defenders - Havek (Beatriz at Dinner), Ari Graynor (Youth in *Revolt*), and Jennifer Coolidge (Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Jar Bad Day) — returning to the fold. No uary matter how big or small their role, he collaborates with his actresses to find some 30, truth in their characters. But this ersatz ,2020 ensemble proved to be an unconquerable challenge. 2020. — S.M. ● (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Little Women — Director Greta Gerwig reteams with her Ladybird star Saoirse Ronan for a cast-heavy but still nimble adaptation of Louisa May Alcott's story of sisters making a home and making a life in spite of of limited options and opportunties. (Neither Meryl Streep as stern Aunt March nor Emma Watson as pretty Meg are given room to let their sheer star power overwhelm the proceedings, while Timothee Chalamet as Laurie and Laura Dern as Marmee do solid enough work, and Florence Pugh as tempremental Amy and Chris Cooper as gruff Mr. Laurence give great delight.) And it is very much an adaptation, the narrative scrambled so that it tells the story of a writer's beginnings: Jo's journey from a citified hack scribbling for money to a serious artist with the humility and courage to mine her seemingly humdrum life for material. The book she will eventually write is about her family, but this here story is Jo's. She is not always onscreen, but every thing we're shown is for her sake. Ronan handles her central role with aplomb, but the shift does tend to drain some of the surrounding events of their emotional affect — as if they will only gain their proper force and meaning once they've been put on the page. Once Upon a Time...in Holly-

wood — The studio rep at the screening asked that both audience and critics not provide any spoilers for this, Quentin Tarantino's ninth film. But Tarantino himself tells you everything you need to know on the "what happens" front with the title: the fairy-tale formulation that pauses before telling you the setting. Not in Nazi Germany, as in Inglourious Basterds. Not in the slaving South, as in Django Unchained. But in Hollywood - specifically, 1969 Hollywood, just as the damn dirty hippies were arriving to upset the ailing industry's apple cart. (Easy Rider was released a month before this film's climax, and aging Western TV star Rick Dalton (Leonardo DeCaprio) goes so far as to call a trespasser on his private road "Dennis

Hopper.") Of course, movies weren't all the hippies had on their mind: society at large was in for a reckoning, with all its glitz and glam serving to obscure its fundamental greed and bloodlust. (Just look at the subject matter of its preferred entertainment: crime and violence everywhere you turn your TV's dial!) Tarantino has an eye for both the neon glories and the grotesque violence, and while it looks for one dizzying moment like he's serious about pitting one against the other, in the end he wraps both in his loving cinematic embrace. Oh yes, the story: it so happens that Rick Dalton, however poor his career choices, has nailed it when it comes to real estate: he finds himself living next door to Roman Polanski, the hottest director in Hollywood, who is renting the place with his gorgeous wife, the actress Sharon Tate. Unluckily for them, however, the house used to belong to someone mixed up with a bearded weirdo named Charles Manson the leader of a hippie commune situated on the site where Dalton and his stuntman Cliff Booth (Brad Pitt) used to make TV shows. Meandering but deliberate, gorgeous and garrulous, it is very much the writer-director doing what he does so well, but in very familiar fashion. Which brings up the intriguing possibility that in making a movie about movie making, his real subject here is himself. 2019. — M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Royal Tenenbaums - Not just a dysfunctional family; a determinedly, unrelentingly oddball, eccentric, wacky, weird, kooky, cracked family; but only a rarely and very mildly funny family. (None of this deters Gene Hackman, as the long-absent head of the clan, from his normal excellence.) Wes Anderson, the director, favors frontal and centered compositions, or frontal and symmetrical ones - the visual equivalent of hammer blows. (Nailing down, if nothing else, the sameness and monotonousness of it all.) And no scene would be complete without a musical selection from the eclectic soundtrack: Ravel to

Vivaldi, the Ramones to the Beach Boys, Dylan to Nico. With Anjelica Huston, Gwyneth Paltrow, Ben Stiller, Luke Wilson, Owen Wilson, Danny Glover, Bill Murray. 2001. — D.S. ★ (LAND-MARK KEN)

Star Wars: The Rise Of Sky-

walker – Well, that's over. After Rian Johnson's Episode VIII: The Riling of the Fanbase, Disney lets J.J. Abrams resume the Star Wars cockpit, and the man who gave new meaning to fan service with The Force Awakens wastes no time before initiating course correction. When we meet up with brash pilot Poe, he's lightspeed-skipping his way out of trouble, and Abrams is in much the same mode, whisking you from one thing to the next before you have much time to think or feel anything in response. Suffice to say, there's a terrible new (or old, depending on how you reckon it) threat out there, and very little time to do anything about it, and our heroes need to find a clue that will help them find a tracker that will help them

find...you get the idea. Mission, mission, mission, and hope the characters can register along the way. They can't, not when they're made to do things that don't make much sense except in the service of spectacle - viz. just about every Force-fed encounter between conflicted baddie Kylo Ren and even more conflicted goodie Rey. (One of them includes the film's biggest howler: a version of Obi-Wan's "What I said was true, from a certain point of view" that serves as a direct rebuke of Johnson's vision.) It's a ride, but it's exhausting, and not just for the audience: by the time Poe is rallying the troops for the big battle, he sounds utterly pooped. It's a pity; the big battle in the sky is a bust, but the personal drama that goes on down below feels like what Abrams should have been attending to all along. Fans of the series will groove to the old familiar beats and see the old familiar sights. For some, that will be enough - maybe even satisfying. Others may find themselves wondering exactly why they used to love this stuff so much. 2019. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Uncut Gems — Howard Ratner's (Adam Sandler) day is consumed with robbing Peter to pawn to Paul. His life is a constant juggling act, his desperate ploy a complex series of bets involving a multitude of moving parts. If he can distract his clients long enough to keep afloat everything, the rewards could top over a million. Howard is based on a real-life character who worked alongside directors Josh and Benny Safdie's dad in the Diamond District back in the day. There's much scuzzy fun to be had, but nothing tops a moment of unexpected sensuality between married Howard a his younger secretary/mistress (Julia Fox in a blistering debut). Pretending that he's in a cab, Howard hides in the closet, sexting Julia as he watches her prepare for his arrival. For a brief moment, we're granted full access to Howard's charisma; we understand what drove the directors to fashion an entire feature around him. And while the Safdies aren't able to shake all the obvious tropes - dangling a character head first out a window, a gag involving a file and a security door, etc. - their vision is singular enough to keep it interesting up until the ending ... well, just ends. 2019. — S.M. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Underwater — Will Eubank trades in the cramped, outmoded U.S. Air Force base that played home to extraterrestrial biological entities in his previous film, The Signal, for an underwater research lab imagineered in a style that evokes a crumbling '80s health club. There's nothing alien about this plot: a subterranean tremor does irreparable structural damage to the facility. And no sooner does the ocean rebel against the corporate-financed mission than it's up to our six surviving occupants to improvise an escape route, unexpectedly lined with Dolby-flexing sea monsters. What once would have been classified a B-movie boasts an A-list performance by Kristen Stewart, surpassed only by cinematographer Bojan Bazelli's buoyant ascent through a torrent of flickering sludge. Providing the occasional unintentional laughs are T.J. Miller's growingly annoying variation on a waterlogged Jeff Spicoli and a mumbling, decidedly undecided Jessica Henwick who, not knowing whether to laugh, cry, or shriek, will on occasion do all three. Learning to Skateboard in a War Zone (If You're a Girl) (2019)

What I like most about the film is that it never posits sports as a means of escape from one's dire straits, or as a career path that might lead to becoming the next dope female skating sensation like Lacy Baker. Walk, Run, Cha-Cha (2019)

Paul and Millie met in Vietnam at a time when attending a dance party was considered an illegal act, but they didn't care. He's an engineer who, after the war ended, made a beeline for the United States. The couple was separated for six years, but Millie eventually joined Paul in California, where she's currently an auditor. They're living the American dream, and the plan is to keep their love alive by dancing their way through their Golden Years. One new wrinkle: director Laura Nix shoots her subjects in closeup, but instead of talking heads, she presents telepathic heads: their lips are sealed, their words presented in voiceover. The romance is palpable, and there's even a musical number of sorts. Look, it's a nice little film, the type one would expect to find on PBS when they have time to fill between reruns of *Antiques Roadshow*. But never in one's wildest imagination should featherweight, well-intentioned sentiment such as this be construed as award-worthy. Produced by the *New York Times*.

The Way the World Works

— Residents of the small town of Hilgermissen in northwestern Germany voted decisively on Feb. 3 against naming the community's streets. Currently, addresses are a house number and the name of one of the former villages that combined to create Hilgermissen in the 1970s, reported the Associated Press. Officials had hoped that street names would ease the jobs of emergency services and delivery drivers, but 60 percent of the 2,200 citizens rejected the council's plan. The recent result will be binding for two years.

Thieving With Style

A BP gas station in Swansea, South Carolina, was the setting for a reprise of at least one iconic moment from 1984's "The Karate Kid," according to Fox News. On Jan. 26, as surveillance cameras looked on, an unidentified man struck Mr. Miyagi's signature Crane Technique pose – twice – before stealing a purse from a parked car nearby. The Swansea Police Department posted the video to its Facebook page, and with the public's help, officers were able to identify the man and issue warrants for his arrest.

Smoke 'Em If You Got 'Em

Pavlos Polakis, Greece's deputy health minister, did not take kindly to a recent reprimand from European Union Health Commissioner Vytenis Andriukaitis, who admonished Polakis for smoking in public. Andriukaitis was in Athens Feb. 4 to mark World Cancer Day, reported Reuters. He also complained that the health ministry smelled of cigarette smoke and that nobody wears ties. Polakis replied in a Facebook post about the casual dress: "That's a lie ... the security guard at the entrance wore one. I don't. It's the suits which passed through here who bankrupted our country." As for the scold about smoking, Polakis reotred: "TII decide when to stop smoking, on my terms." Greece has the

- The Harlem Romantic Depot lingerie store in New York City was the target of a vandal's political rage on Jan. 26. In surveillance video, the man can be seen pacing up and down in front of the store window, where two mannequins were on display: one of President Barack Obama dressed as a prince, and one of President Donald Trump, dressed as a princess and wearing a MAGA hat. Taking a brick or stone from a nearby construction site, the man used it to smash through the window, store owner Glen Buzzetti told the New York Daily News. Next, he yanked the Obama mannequin out of the window and threw it on the ground. A member of the store's security team was able to chase the man down the block and catch him, Buzzetti said. But Obama fans in the street weren't happy with him, either. "We had to protect him from the crowd," Buzzetti said. "He could have been killed. We had women trying to kick him in the head." He said the man kept repeating that "he hated Obama" and that "the (Obama) mannequin was looking at him bad."
