Money for nothing

Convention Center will stay same size, but PR wallets still expand

When San Diego's hotel lobby began its quest for an expanded downtown convention center via a 2018 tax hike initiative, some local political professionals were skeptical.

Their doubts turned to disdain in May 2018, when the hotel owners, now allied with well-heeled labor unions, came up with a modest campaign war chest and proceeded to lavish much of the cash on friends and political associates of Republican San Diego mayor Kevin Faulconer. These included Irvine-based Rick Manter, a onetime Faulconer colleague at the public relations and lobbying firm NCG Porter Novelli, who ultimately got a total of \$83,833, including travel expenses, according to city disclosure filings. Doing even better was lobbying and politics concern **Southwest Strategies, a longtime Faulconer** financial backer, which received a total of \$170,677, records show. Manolatos Nelson Murphy, another Faulconer-friendly PR outfit, got \$33,136.

But the signature-gathering drive went so slowly that GOP ex-mayor and Chamber of Commerce honcho Jerry Sanders issued a last-minute call for volunteers. "If each of our Board members helps to gather 50 signatures through work, friends, and family, we can ensure this important initiative is placed on the November ballot," said Sanders in a June 2018 email reported by the Union-Tribune. And in the end, proponents managed to increase their budget, but barely mustered enough signatures, forcing them to pull strings at the city council to hustle the tax hike measure onto the March 2020 primary hallot. Veteran local campaign observers estimated that achieving the legally required two-thirds vote for approval would end up costing backers between \$3 million and \$5 million to pull off. But fundraising continued to lag, revealing the limitations of how much cash hotels and their suppliers were willing to put into the tax hike.

Finally, with polls showing Measure C below the threshold for approval, hotel owners adjacent to the convention center stepped up with more money. On January 14, the Hilton San Diego Bayfront gave \$200,000. On January 27, Marriott International came up with \$250,000. The Manchester Grand Hyatt contributed \$250,000 on February 5. And late reports show the Manchester Grand Hyatt came up with an additional \$50,000, as did Hilton, on March 2, the day before the election. (Hilton also contributed \$50,000 on February 20.)

The total collected from January 1 through February 14 was \$1.91 million, records show. Data from city disclosure reports filed by proponents show that their committee spent a total of \$1.9 million during the same period, well under what those in the political know said was the required minimum of \$3 million or more in the face of voter doubts about the openended proposal.

Despite serving up another embarrassing failure for the mayor, his longtime associates appear to have done well financially. Axiom Strategies of Kansas City, where ex-Faulconer chief of staff Stephen Puetz is senior vice-president, got \$132,586 on January 19. Subsidiary AxMedia received \$535,592 for "TV and Radio Ads" on January 18 and \$655,424 for telephone work on February 15, according to city disclosure reports.

Creative air pollution solution, or "unscientific" nonsense?

ne might look at former CalTrans engineer Neil Prescott as a latter day Don Quixote tilting at the North Coast Corridor highway proj-

ect. Rather than defeat it, however, he wants to enhance the project with an outlandish system he says would virtually eliminate vehicle exhaust pollution that will otherwise accompany the road for years to come.

The CalTrans and San Diego Association of Governments' joint plan to improve coastal traffic flow on Interstate 5 through coastal North County, among other goals, was conceived in 1980. This year, 2020,

marks two thirds of the way toward completing the job's several phases, such as its environmental impact report in 2014 for example. Last summer saw the start of building two new lanes on each side of the freeway.

And that's when Neil Prescott approached Cal-Trans with his rather late-in-the-game proposal. Personal circumstances at the time had him driving from his home in Victorville to visit the Moores Cancer Center at UCSD, where he routinely saw many children being treated for cancer. The brutal realities prompted him to look into

the latest research on the causes of cancer. What he found, he tells me, is that air containing ozone, the main ingredient in smog, and particle pollutants,

both present in motor vehicle emissions, can bring on such childhood cancers as acute lymphoblastic leukemia, retinoblastoma, and germ cell tumors, not to mention adult afflictions cardiovascular disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, and diabetes. And, of course, there is asthma, which affects both children and adults.

Prescott tells me he next looked at demographic statistics about population densities contiguous to the stretch of the I-5 being expanded in the North Coast Corridor project, namely, the 26 miles between La

Jolla Village Drive and Harbor Drive in Oceanside. From that information he estimated that 116,000 children ages 6 through 16 live next to the freeway, or play on playgrounds next to it.

Great to decrease traffic congestion, Prescott thought, but what about the air pollution from vehicle exhausts? During my conversations with him, I got the impression of a person consumed with pre-

> venting childhood cancers to the point of an obsession.

> On August 20, 2019, nineteen days after being seized by the passion, Prescott says he contacted the CalTrans I-5 Corridor Project manager. "I hand delivered the idea I came up with," he says. He had devised a plan to reduce the exhaust pollution that was settling onto the schools and playgrounds. Ninety-nine percent of it

could be eliminated, he tells me.

Prescott says he later sent a letter to CalTrans. SANDAG, and the cities through which the North Coast Corridor highway project runs. The letter he shows me is a rambling, five-page screed expressing an urgency about the problem of vehicle emissions pollution. At one point in the letter, he argues: "Funding for air quality on highway gas tax projects is currently \$2.45 billion per annum." (I was unable to verfiy the claim.) "However, there has been zero expenditure since 2016

when it was initiated, because highway departments are focused only on congestion, because of significant pressure to decrease commute travel times."

The project build team told me by email: "What we received (Caltrans, SAN-DAG, and the city managers of Del Mar, Solana Beach, Encinitas, Carlsbad, Oceanside, Vista) was an email asking to have [Prescott's] company, KLS Engineering, hired as 'Oversight Engineering Consultant." On September 21, 2019, the project team responded to Prescott by email, reminding him that in 2013 an environmental impact report had been approved for the North Coast Corridor project. It noted, too, that the following year the California Coastal Commission had given the project its blessing.

The email followed up with mentions of two websites that explain how to go "about doing business with," first CalTrans and then with SANDAG.

Lost in the process was Prescott's actual proposal for how to eliminate highway pollution that causes cancer. What he explains to me over coffee is straightforward enough. In a nutshell, Prescott wants to put a roof over the six eventual lanes going in both the south and north directions. "Not a solid roof," he tells me.

Here is the best picture I can paint. The roof is supported by trusses over which meshes made of chain link fencing are placed. Vines coming up from below grow into and through the mesh, creating an aerated roof. One sees such vines already growing on the retaining walls and noise barriers along the sides of Highway 76 in North County, among other places. A filtration fabric that requires occasional replacement underlies the permanent vines. Below that, photo electro-chemical air cleaners of 10 horsepower are situated strategically inside the tunnel-like structure. As vehicle exhaust fumes rise, the fabric and cleaners trap and filter them while the vines absorb the pollutants that would normally be blown into surrounding neighborhoods,

schools, and playgrounds.
Prescott is a licensed civil engineer and the owner of the Southern California company he calls KLS

Engineering. From 1991 to 1999, he worked as a traffic engineer for CalTrans in Orange County. "Toward the end of my time there," he tells me, "management told me I was getting too old for the work and assigned me to the planning department. That was the most fun of my entire career, because I was looking at the big picture."

The idea of a freeway roof "is an engineered system built from putting components together that anybody can do," says Prescott. "But this would be the first time ever that it would be put into place."

A roof over the freeway? you ask. What about the occasional glimpses of the ocean I get to keep me from going bonkers as I'm stuck in traffic. And for 26 miles between La Jolla Village Drive and Oceanside? I'd be ready for the looney bin before 10 of those miles.

I met two Uber drivers who spoke more positively continued on page 21

Sierra Club's top enemy Developer Newland Sierra lost the campaign for Measure B, its ballot battle against the high-end Golden Door spa over a massive residential project in North

County in last week's election. The University City concern did better with its money in San Diego, coming up with \$10,000 on March 3, election day, for a so-called independent expenditure committee run by the Laborers' International Union of North America Local 89 on behalf of city council hopeful **Kelvin Barrios**. A former employee of the union, Barrios placed first in the race to replace another of his for-



Barrios, who last year was hit with a \$4000 fine by the California Fair Political Practices Commission for spending money from another campaign to defray a variety of personal expenses, will run off against Sierra Club-backed **Sean Elo**. Newland was joined in contributing to labor's expenditure committee by a bevy of union political action committees, including Laborers' International Union of North America Local 1309 PAC, California Laborers for Equality and Progress, San Diego Works, Laborers Pacific Southwest Regional Organizing Coalition PAC, as well as the Southern California


District Council of Laborers PAC, for a total haul of \$140,000 as of last report.

Facebook is out with a list of its biggest political advertisers in California from February 2 to March 2. Not surprisingly, ex-New York mayor Mike Bloomberg's quixotic presidential bid was at the top with a whopping \$4.3 million. Next came fellow billionaire Tom Stever with

\$1,082,890 and Democratic primary victor **Bernie Sanders** with \$897,140. Placing seventh with a spend of \$202,987 was San Diego's own Yes on C campaign, the heavily funded but ill-starred effort to hike the tax on hotel stays to fund an expansion of the downtown convention center and homeless relief.

Shrinks' paradise As the county's lone Democratic supervisor, **Nathan Fletcher** has been pushing an ambitious effort to reform local mental health delivery for the poor. "The Behavioral Health System in San Diego is broken," says Fletcher's county website. "The services available are fragmented and not easily accessible. People

with Behavioral Health struggles are ending up on the streets." Whether or not more public spending works, the price for new professional services is emerging on the county's help-wanted job site.

But the latest word has it that after moving to Carlsbad, the magazine will drop from 10 to 6 issues a year and cut circulation to one million. The move comes at a fluid time for Adventure Sports, with the unexplained exit of **Norb Garrett**, who ran the operation for a decade, according to a February 24 account on the sports media website *ShopEatSurf*.

Palomar schools other academic radio operations

While KPBS-FM is officially a non-profit, it took in over \$26 million in donations during the 2019 fiscal year. The station also regularly finishes in the top three in the Nielsen ratings among all San Diego stations. On the other side of the non-profit radio spectrum is Palomar College's KKSM AM-1320, a 500-watt station with annual budget of about \$10,000. Remarkably, it continues to win national awards and helps launch broadcast careers.

Between the two is KSDS 88.3 FM, with studios on San Diego City College. Its 22,000-watt FM signal blankets San Diego County, super-serving fans of straight-ahead jazz, blues, and big-band music. Bucking the national trend for commercial radio, all the KSDS DJ's are live and local. On a recent show, nighttime DJ John Phillips imparted fun-fact jazz trivia – like how jazz drum-

mer Art Blakey switched from keyboards to drums because a club owner forced him at gunpoint to give up his seat at the piano to Errol Garner. Despite this, the most recent KSDS ratings showed it had just a 0.4 market share (compared to KPBS-FM, which regularly shows a 6.0 rating). Plus, the students of City College don't get the on-air experience at KSDS they enjoy at Palomar's KKSM. Asked why, City College spokesperson Cesar Gumapas responded: "This is a personnel matter, and district policy restricts us from commenting on these type of matters."

It may seem strange, then, to learn that the San Diego Community College District has been propping up KSDS with hundreds of thousands of dollars a year. The station's latest financial statement (through June 30, 2019) showed that it keeps going deeper in debt. KSDS owed the district a total of \$1,085,596 at the end of the 2019 fiscal year, up from \$755,734 a year before. "KSDS is financially dependent on the San Diego City College to support them," is how the

CPA firm Munger & Company summarized KSDS's status. "Without the ongoing financial support from the District or College Foundation, KSDS would not be able to continue."

KSDS employs six full-time and six part-time staffers, and all the DJs with once-a-week specialty shows get paid. Neither KSDS nor City College were forthcoming about the station's red ink status, and spokesperson Gumapas would not comment about KSDS's annual need for hundreds of thousands of dollars from the SDCC's general fund, other than to say that the rumor that the station may be for sale was not true. But one KSDS

employee who did not want to be named said his station has reduced its budget "down to the bare bones. We don't spend what isn't absolutely necessary. We are in the process of creating a board that will run the station as a separate entity." He said that currently, the KSDS operations are ultimately overseen by SDCC president Dr. Ricky Shabazz. "We want to create a new, separate foundation."

Palomar's KKSM made it onto the air when three broadcast towers in Oceanside were donated to the college in 1996. Since

then, the school has received "former students from San Diego City College who came over to us when they found out they could not get on the air at KSDS," according to Zeb Navarro, KKSM general manager and Palomar College broadcast instructor. Since its inception, KKSM (and Palomar College's telecommunication program) has seen a number of its graduates move on to careers in broadcasting, including Greg Simms (KRTH, Los Angeles), sports journalist Jeanne Zelasko, and Jesse Lozano (Star 94.1). The current

KKSM lineup is a hodgepodge of shows, including sports talk show "The Spurge," the all-reggae "Yard Sounds," a talk and music "Club Tues-Gays," an oldies show dedicated to "One Hit Wonders," and a local music show called "Not So Serious Radio."

Navarro said KKSM is where future broadcasters can get over their fear of live radio and learn the basics of broadcasting. "I tell the students this is where they can crash the car, and then crash the car again until they learn

how to drive." And learn they do: KKSM just won the award for Best College Station in the Nation from the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System. It was the only AM station nominated. ("It's the new underground radio," Navarro says of the band.) The other six stations — in Chicago, Los Angeles, and Hartford, Connecticut — were FM. KKSM also

won the award in 2015 and 2017. Navarro says he has 19 students connected with KKSM and 44 students in his intro to broadcasting class — despite industry downturns. "I tell them it is getting very, very hard. That they should consider getting into management or considering doing other things like podcasting. I tell them not to expect to auto-

matically expect to make six figures, and that if you want to get into it, you really have to love it. But I think at some point, broadcasting will swing back to local content."

Over at San Diego State University, the

50 telecommunication students per semester who get accepted to the KPBS internship program do not get on-air access to KPBS-FM. But KPBS spokesperson Heather Milne Barger says they do get hands-on experience at the KPBS radio and TV stations. "They get jobs in every single department, from being embedded in the news department, to

working behind the camera, to finance, to helping run station events." Plus, she says, all the SDSU interns get paid minimum wage during their KPBS internship.

Glyphosate hate to seal Roundup's fate?

Supervisors seek safer solution

Glyphosate is everywhere, taking over like the weeds it's meant to kill. But now, the bestselling weedbuster of all time has become its own sort of pest. "Everybody in this room has glyphosate and other components of Roundup in their body," said Dave Schubert, a researcher at Salk Institute who spoke last week in favor of a ban that supervisors have proposed for the unincorporated county.

Around the country, tens of thousands of lawsuits have targeted glyphosate-based herbicides, which homeowners, groundskeepers, and others say caused their cancer. Heavy use of the chemical in agriculture has promoted superweeds, and it is suspected of harming pollinators like honeybees. That's why Non-Toxic San Diego and other groups have pushed for an end to its use in the city, and that, combined with the lawsuits and three big wins by California plaintiffs, is what led supervisors Nathan Fletcher and Dianne Jacob to propose a ban for the county and a search for safer alternatives. "I'm all for killing weeds, but I think we should do it in a responsible way," said supervisor Fletcher.

The county departments that use glyphosate include Agriculture, Weights & Measurements, Parks and Recreation, General Services, and Public Works. It's sprayed on parks, playgrounds, sport fields, and other green spaces. John Botter, with the group Cleaner for Kids, said he requested 2019 pesticide use records for county lands, "and what I found is that almost 1700 gallons of glyphosate were used on managed county lands," mostly by Agriculture, Weights & Measurements. "We all drive by and live by and walk by these farms and fields." And Gina Feletar, a citizen volunteer with the Xerces Society who works on butterfly conservation, says that "we suspect the numbers listed are underestimated." Pesticide reports pulled by the group showed that in a single district, 293 gallons of Roundup were sprayed at Liberty Station over three days last March, and Robb Field was treated with 623 gallons for two weeks last January.

Supporters say glyphosate is popular because it works so well and is cost-effective. Bayer bought Monsanto in 2018, laying claim to its blockbuster product Roundup,

Supervisor Kristin Gaspar said that when she was mayor of Encinitas, the city pioneered the idea as a small pilot project in Glen Park. Harry Ryan stirs up the coffee world

"As a customer," says Harry Ryan, "what's your concern when you go to buy a cup of coffee?"

He answers his own question.

"You want to have a fresh, hot, quality brew."
Harry is one of the three Ryan Brothers, along with Carmine and Tom, who started in 1994 with coffee carts in La Jolla and Old Town. Today, they have seven brick and mortar outlets, and a

reputation as innovators in the coffee world.

"As a producer," continues Harry, "my concerns are: when was it brewed? Has it been sitting too long in the urn,? If they grew it right, did they grind it too soon before they brewed it? Is it dried out? Are the urns clean? On and on.



"The beer industry

has a brewmaster. The brewmaster brews. And they do it well, because they don't want to throw out, they don't want to have mistakes. If you throw that [crucial job] over to a multitude of hourly workers, as happens in the coffee world, the chances of bad brews go way up."

But it's the wastage that gets Harry really exercised. "Let's look at Starbucks, for instance. They have a brew standard. They brew every 30 minutes, is what I've been told. Same in the hotel industry. And whatever's not consumed is dumped."

He contrasts this with the beer industry, the wine industry. "They're not dumping. You're paying premium. In our [coffee] industry, we don't really want to say how much they're throwing out, because the customer's paying for it all."

What to do? Enter Harry Ryan, inventor.

"My method solves that. Because what I do is I keg all my coffees. I use cooler temps to get better extraction, then I keg it. I nitrogen gas flush it — like beer, except it's nitrogen — but then I put it through my patented hot draft technique,


which is a tankless heat coil. So, as the coffee comes up, it gets heated on demand."

He's tinkering with a chrome box on a little tower. "Hot Draft," says the sign. "US Patent 10,092,132."

"This is where my heat coil is," he says, "and look what you get. It pours like a Guinness." He's right. It comes out creamy, incredibly smooth-looking.

"Think about it," he says. "The keg does

not need refrigerating, because there's no oxidation going on. Also, and this is just as big, every ounce of the coffee is going to be used. Taste that! No cream, no sugar. That's my heaven. Stored in room temp. It's not sitting there heated. I could store it for a year, it'd come out as fresh as the day I brewed it."



I'd always remembered Ryan Brothers' coffee place in Barrio Logan, because inside, they have an Indonesian rickshaw to remind the brothers of their childhood, which they spent over there. And also a bar top at which outlaw Jesse James drank, though probably not coffee.

As you wait for your cuppa, you have to ask yourself: is Harry Ryan about to stir up the coffee world?

The "gentefication" cart

Next month, April 25, Barrio Logan will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of the birth of Chicano Park. And the surprise question? Is success bringing about the demise of this most culturally cohesive neighborhood?

It's eight o'clock on a Thursday night. I'm here on Logan Avenue. Latin jazz flares out of Border X, at Logan and Sampson. Janice Luna Reynoso and her friend Paulina Jimenez stand by a "coffee and culture" cart business they have named "Gentefication."

They sell Mexican items such as bundles of sage, hats, and steaming hot cups of *cafe de la olla*.

"The name? To make people uncomfortable," says Luna. She says gentrification is nibbling into Barrio Logan's marrow, and she's desperately looking for a way to change the trajectory. "That's really why we created this cart, to draw

thrive. We're artists, we're entrepreneurs, but we want gentrification, change, to take more of a positive role. Because when we say *gente*, in our community, '*Eres bien gente*', it's like, 'You're really good people.' These are the people, the *pueblo*. We want to go back to that root word. It's about building capital, but community capital, rather than financial capital.'

Luna knows the effects of gentrification. "I've

people into conversations about gentrification." She's ready to argue the point with anyone while she hands out her delicious cinnamon coffee.

Luna has deep roots in the area. She runs community gardens in National City and elsewhere. "Gentrification can be looked at in two different ways. Like me: I'm an artist, an entrepreneur. Brown folks like myself are San Diegans who have grown up in the different barrios. Yet we in a sense have contributed to the issue of gentrification. Because we have opened stores, we're selling

the goods that are recognized as coming from our culture. Our culture is very beloved in the community, and it attracts outsiders to the barrio. We also have to take the responsibility of owning our own businesses. We're adding to the increase in property values. People say, 'Oh you're a gentrifier. You're actually from here, but you're creating a problem."

She says she's working hard to give back, to somehow mitigate the effects of their success. "Yes, we're gentrifiers, because we want to see our community been displaced a couple of times with my three daughters. From Golden Hill, and National City as well, and we ended up house-surfing because of rent hikes. Rent went up because of gentrification, so I'm passionate about that. Even a safe space like Chicano Art Gallery was pushed out last year. When people from outside the barrio come for coffee, and they see our 'Gentefication' sign, it's that uncomfortable silence for a moment, and then it's either awkward and 'thank you,' and then they take their

coffee and leave a good tip, or some say 'Thank you for talking about this with us.' So it has been a mixed response. More the awkward glance and discomfort, but I'm okay with that. At least we're having this conversation."

Does she believe the real Barrio Logan will survive? "I have to believe that we're making a change, inspired by the leaders who brought Chicano Park into being 50 years ago, who fought for civil rights before us. I'm an artist, and we're using what we call 'Artivism' — art to activate people's hearts."

ing the property a stately drive directs you through the cedar wood and ironclad security gates." The vestibule entry "is covered inside and out in old world stone," with "deep set windows, a custom wood ceiling, creative lighting and an oversized dramatic entry door."

Inside, the luxe

kitchen features "a massive Calcatta gold marble island integrated with a custom maple butcher block and detailed beam ceiling design," along with

"full panel softclose rift oak cabinetry" and "the highest quality appliance package" including a gas range with 15-inch induction and Teppanyaki burners and dual exhaust hoods "tastefully concealed in the cabinetry." Thor slain in Carlsbad

EDUARDO PUT A CHAIN around the front doors of the convenience store so he could go to the back for a break. "Because there are a lot of homeless people out at night," he explained. He was working the overnight shift at the AM/PM store of the Arco gasoline station

in Carlsbad. The store is open 24 hours.

It was just after 1 am on July 10, 2019 when Eduardo took his break. It was a mild night, 67 degrees and no wind at all. The usual number of transients were out and about. Then, "I heard the chain rattling and I looked... Some guy tried to open the door; he tried to get inside."

Eduardo said he saw a skinny man at the doors wearing a backpack. And

then a man ran up. He "had no shirt on."

The man wearing the backpack ran away and the shirtless man chased him. The two men ended up in the middle of Tamarack Avenue. Eduardo could see them swinging fists at each other. And then the man with the backpack ran away, passing through the parking lot next to the AM/

PM. The shirtless man remained standing in the street for a minute or so, and then he dropped.

Eduardo remembered seeing the shirtless man fall to the ground. "He only fell once." Eduardo testified in court later, "At first I thought he got knocked out. I

called the cops."

After cops arrived, they reviewed footage from the gas station's surveillance cameras with Eduardo. When he testified, Eduardo confirmed the time stamps on the video. It was 1:12 am when the first man appeared, moving towards the front doors of the AM/PM. It was 1:16 when he rattled

the chained doors, trying to get inside. It was 1:17 when the shirtless man appeared and he chased the first man. It was 1:18 when Eduardo phoned 911.

At 1:20, the shirtless man dropped to the ground in the street.

He was still breathing when Carlsbad police arrived, but he was non-responsive. There was a lot of blood, especially from two wounds in his abdomen. The mortally wounded man was taken to hospital and pro-

> nounced deceased at 1:55 am. He was identified as 35-year-old Eric John Blackstoc. He had "no known address."

> Police looked but did not find any weapons on the wounded man, nor any near him in the street.

> Police circulated still photos taken from the AM/PM surveillance video. Officer Casey Monahan first identified the man with the backpack. He believed it

was another homeless man named Jay Terry. "I remembered that Jay had a girlfriend with very blonde hair," he said. "They were always together. And they had a black pit bull-type dog."

Carlsbad police quickly put this information out to other law enforcement.

619-493-4264 www.prisandiego.com Jonathan Kislingbury has been with the Oceanside Harbor Police for 26 years. He patrols the beaches of Oceanside by land and by water. On July 10, 2019, he was in a patrol vehicle on the streets about 4:39 am when he got a description of a white male walking with a blonde female and a black pit bull dog, supposedly traveling north along the coast.

Officer Kislingbury positioned himself along a likely stretch of beach, and spotted the threesome at 4:50 am. He was in the 100 block

of South Pacific Street when the man, woman, and dog came up a stairwell from the boardwalk below, right in front of his patrol car. This was about four miles from the site of the deadly confrontation in Carlsbad.

Ronald Dement has been with Carlsbad police for 13 years. He interviewed both the male suspect and his female companion at police headquarters that morning. The male suspect was confirmed to be 36-year-old Jay Terry. Officer Dement said he first spoke with the 35-year-old blonde. She

told him they were walking to Oceanside to get a hotel room and they just wanted to go to bed. She had been dating Terry, her boyfriend, for seven years, and they had become homeless about a year and a half ago. She said this past year was especially hard. One time, she testified, when her boyfriend was sick, he "backhanded her." But just that once, she insisted.

When officer Dement testified in court six months after the interview, he remembered the blonde said that she was "on the verge of breaking up with Mr. Terry for good this time."

The blonde said she had a phone and her boyfriend did not, and that this made it hard to find each other again whenever they became separated. So they wasted a lot of time trying to meet up. It was frustrating. She said last night she went to the Stag & Lion on Tamarack Avenue just west of Insterstate 5, trying to find her boyfriend. That was an abandoned building where they often spent the night. Once it had been a pub, but now it was popular with the homeless population. And it was conveniently next to the Arco station's AM/PM mini-mart.

The blonde said she was walking toward the Stag & Lion when she saw a man sitting on a curb there. She had known him for about two weeks; she had seen him maybe times altogether. He called himself Thor and Odin. Those were his street names for himself. (No one knew him by his real name: Eric Blackstock.)

The blonde said this man, Thor Odin, had declared his love for her. And he described himself as a Greek god. She described him as "ripped" or "buff" and "much bigger" than

her boyfriend.

The blonde said there had been flirting between the two of them, flirting which may have led to a tense interaction between her boyfriend Terry and Thor Odin. It happened when the buff man asked for a cigarette. When Terry held out a cigarette toward Thor Odin, the larger man violently smacked away his hand.

When the cop spoke separately with Terry, he confirmed the story. "He is always just so aggressive," the boyfriend said. "One time he asked me for a cigarette, and I only had half a cigarette and I said, "Here," and he just slapped it out of my hand."

The man with the back-

pack said that on the night of July 10, 2019 at about 1 am, "I was trying to go to my camp, that is what I was trying to do." He said he lived on the roof of the Stag & Lion.

Terry knew Thor Odin as an unpredictable, violent man, and he was trying to avoid him. He was trying to sneak up to his "camping" place, but when he saw Thor Odin talking with his girlfriend, he gave up trying not to be seen.

Terry and the blonde both told police that Terry demanded to know what Thor Odin had said. And he replied, "You're a punk bitch."

Then Terry pulled out a pool cue stick which kept in his backpack. (Terry

explained that he carried the pool stick to use as a cane, because he had an abscess on his foot.) He said tried to "fend off" the self-styled Greek god with the stick, though his girlfriend had the impression he intended to hit Thor Odin in the head with it. In any case, Thor Odin easily took away the pool cue and tossed it aside. Officers later found the it in the parking lot.

The blonde went to tie up her pit bull, because it became agitated. Terry said he tried to escape from Thor Odin. Terry ran across the parking lot toward the AM/PM mini mart. "He wouldn't leave me alone. I was running away from him, and he wouldn't stop chasing me."

Terry said Thor Odin caught him by his shirt collar in the street and punched him in the side of his head three times. ("I did not see any obvious bruising or swelling or redness to that temple," Officer Dement testified later.)

During the police interview, Terry explained that he "open-carried" a knife in a sheath on his hip, because he lived on the street and needed protection. Terry said he stabbed his attacker once, but that it didn't do anything to stop him, "He just kept coming after me." Terry guessed he stabbed his attacker perhaps three times, total.

Officer Dement found a bloody knife in a hedge bordering the parking lot of the Stag & Lion. The knife was resting in the bushes at eye level, as if someone had carefully placed it there, Dement said. The knife was made to cut insulation, and is something that can be bought at Home Depot stores, according to the cop.

Dr. Steven Campman is a forensic pathologist for the San Diego County Medical Examiner's office. He has done more than 5000

autopsies. He found multiple stab wounds and shallow cuts on Blackstock. The doctor said four of the stab wounds were particularly life-threatening: to the liver, to the abdomen, to the ribs, and to the left armpit.

A toxicology test showed THC and alcohol in the deceased man's blood.

Defense attorney Patricia Valdovinos asserted that it was a case of self-defense. She said her client, Jay Terry, has been jumped and beaten up and has suffered a lot of concussions during his life on the street. "Mister Terry truly thought his life was in danger."

The attorney said there are witnesses who knew Thor Odin as a full-blown alcoholic who frequently ripped off his shirt and challenged others to fight. He screamed at random people; he always had a black eye or cut on his face from recent violence.

Valdovinoes painted Blackstock as a violent criminal by referencing his record, including a 2015 conviction for assault with

great bodily injury.

Honorable judge Brad A. Weinreb declared that a iury should decide the facts of the case. Jay Alexander Terry, now 37, pleads notguilty to first degree murder and is held without bail. His trial is set for March 24, 2020.

about Prescott's plan. Harrison Sydney and Darren Manson didn't think they'd be bothered by driving in a virtual tunnel. "We've got to do something drastic about greenhouse gases," Sydney tells me. "You and I will be long gone by the time serious climate issues start descending on people now young."

And Manson said, "Even if driving in a tunnel bothered me, I'm happy to do it if it helps clean our air."

But Elir Zyrkaj, who drives a Yellow Cab and hails from Albania, isn't so sure. "When I lived in Italy, I drove several times through the Gotthard Road Tunnel in Switzerland," he said. The tunnel, at 10 and a half miles, is the eighth longest in the world. "I got so anxious I couldn't wait to get out of there. I started feeling like I couldn't breathe."

Prescott says nothing so freaky as that could happen in what he's talking about. "A little bit of light will seep through the vines," he says. "And there'd be artificial light inside, like in ordinary tunnels. But there is the problem of people getting hibernated," Prescott admits. "So there will have to be breaks every five miles

or so. The lagoons along Highway 5 will serve as the perfect places for halting the roofs and drivers to see daylight again."

A number of people I spoke to view the Prescott plan as preposterous. The CalTrans/SANDAG officials only stiff-armed it as completely out of sync with their schedule. I failed to get a comment on its worthiness out of their environmental team, other than CalTrans spokesman Nick Buenviaje reporting that they called it "unscientific."

Of course, the environmental impact report for the North Coast Corridor highway project acknowledges pollution as a problem. It notes that, "along the I-5, there are multiple homes, schools, day care centers, playgrounds and medical facilities.... The California Environmental Protection Agency and California Air Resources Board reported that children who live within 550 feet of heavy traffic have more medical visits than children who live further away from traffic. Medical problems such as slower lung development, asthma and bronchitis are also associated with traffic. For Prescott, the omission of cancer is a fundamental flaw in the report.

But the report maintains that whatever negative effects Highway 5 is now causing to people's health will be mitigated by the greater transportation efficiency the upgrade will produce. "One of the main strategies in the Caltrans' Climate Action Program to reduce [greenhouse gas] emissions is to make California's transportation system more efficient. The highest levels of carbon dioxide from mobile sources, such as automobiles, occur at stopand-go speeds (0-25 mph) and speeds over 55 miles per hour; the most severe emissions occur from 0-25 mph.... To the extent that a project relieves congestion by enhancing operations and improving travel times in high congestion

sions, particularly CO2, may be reduced."

According to Noel Spaid, as reported in the UCSD Guardian as early as November 29, 2010. expanding freeways "is a failed answer." Spaid is president of PLAGUE, a Del Mar community action organization. "We are a car culture, [and the freeways] are full again in two to four years."

In Spaid's view, all modern cities have gone to a metro system. "Perpetually expanding freeways [doesn't] work, and it's a waste of money."

Neil Prescott doesn't go so far. "People gotta eat, and they gotta drive to work." ■







San Diego Reader: How long do you spend writing your sermon?

SDR: What's your favorite subject on which to preach?

PP: Justification by faith alone and Christ alone. I think it's the bedrock of the Christian faith. It is an essential doctrine by which the Church exists and lives out its mission.

SDR: What is your main concern as a member of the clergy?

PP: My main concern is insuring that our aim is to make the name of Jesus known above all, and to make sure everything we do as a congregation is centered on the gospels of Jesus Christ. We are striving to be a healthy church, and in order to achieve the healthiness that would honor the Lord and reflect the commands of Christ to his church, we want to gather regularly to sit under the word preached and see the word demonstrated through the ordinances of baptism and the Lord's supper. We want to do all those things which the Lord uses to conform us to the image of Jesus. Out of the empathy we have for Christ, through regular intake of prayer and through striving and fighting for holiness, we believe that out of the overflow of the intimacy we have with God we will be able to love people in a way that Jesus asked us to, reflected in sacrificial living and opening our homes, practicing generous giving

PP: First PC exists to display the glory of God, declare the good news of Christ Jesus, and make disciples of all nations. We have a three-part strategy. We carry out the mission of the church in light of the gospel; and in light of the gospel we worship, we experience gospel community; and we are faithful to the mission of making disciples.

SDR: What book has had the most impact on your ministry? PP: The Valley of Vision (edited by Arthur Bennett), which is a collection of Puritan prayers. It's always encouraging in the Christian walk to hear from the dead men who lived for Christ well, and to pray with them. In this book, you're reading prayers that Justin Paslay

were written by men deeply devoted to God and who experienced the same struggles we now face in pastoring. It's a bit like getting in the huddle and crying out to God together. It's been a really helpful tool for my soul in ministry.

SDR: Where do you go when

PP: Death is a fork in the road,

and for those who have placed their faith and trust in Christ. they experience his glorified presence, and then they await the reuniting of the glorified body which will be raised from the dead upon his second coming. But the fork in the road for those who have not experienced faith in Jesus Christ is a path of condemnation, of eternal separation. So I do hold to the Christian orthodox view - no waiting game, no purgatory, no crossing your fingers. It's either you experience his holy presence or you exist in external separation where his presence his withheld.







MISSION TRAILS

Cowles Mountain is a very popular, very crowded hike — especially if you're taking it from the Golfcrest/Navajo staging area. However, it's easy to get the feeling of being alone in nature by continuing onto Pyles Peak after you reach the Cowles summit. At 1379 feet, Pyles is the second highest peak in Mission Trails Regional Park. Since the hike doesn't get even five percent of the traffic of Cowles Mountain, there will be lots of moments of just you, the view, and the chaparral. There are two lookout points that give a good view of the park's coastal side and, on a clear day, the actual coast. All told, the combined length of Cowles Mountain and Pyles Peak is about 5.3 miles from Golfcrest/ Navajo.

Cannabis Fitness Training

As San Diego adjusts to life post-cannabis legalization, many locals are finding ways to add marijuana into all aspects of their life, including exercise. Fitness trainer Kendra Solow says THC and CBD both can have beneficial effects on the body before, after, or during exercise, depending on the type of training. It might help you get into a yoga pose more fully or help cool down from a vigorous exercise. Solow's \$110 per hour sessions are strictly BYOCannabis, but she can offer advice on which strains will go best with which type of workout.

Located on the Santee side of Mission Trails near the Kumeyaay Lake Campground, the Grasslands Trail goes over the San Diego River into a grassland area that looks like wide open space (if you ignore the freeway or power line towers in the background.) The trail passes some grinding rocks, used by the Kumeyaay to grind acorns into flour, and can loop over to the Old Mission Dam, a fun and historically important place to climb around. The trail can be up to 4.3 miles or as short as a mile depending on how much of a workout you want. It's mostly flat, so it's a good hike for families. The trail is especially photogenic in the late afternoon when the

Some people get a little jumpy about exercise. For those people, a trampoline park like SkyZone in Chula Vista is just the ticket. Although the place makes most of its bank from birthday parties, monthly memberships starting at \$20 allow people to jump at least 60 minutes a day. The trampolines allow people to practice jump shots they wouldn't otherwise make, but SkyZone is best known for Ultimate Dodgeball, a version of the popular and painful schoolyard sport that allows players a better chance to jump out of the way.

The 24-mile-long trail weaves through downtown San Diego, Chula Vista, Imperial Beach, and Coronado. Thirteen miles of the ride is on a paved, vehicle free path. For a shorter, more family-friendly ride, turn around in Imperial Beach to avoid the on-street bike lanes. If you're lucky, when you whiz through the section of trail adjacent to the San Diego Bay Wildlife Refuge, you might even catch a glimpse of the lone pink flamingo that has made a home in its waters.

that is one part nature and one part urban jungle. Leaving from OB's Dog Beach, bikers can travel four miles to Sefton Park in Mission Valley. The ride takes you under graffiti-covered bridges and through blankets of wildflowers. It gives birdwatchers glimpses of colorful local fauna against the tranquil backdrop of the San Diego River. The path is secluded and well paved, making it a peaceful ride. However, you will run into homeless people living around the path. I've biked the trail several times and have never had an unpleasant experience, but I would recommend riding with a partner.

The David Kreitzer Lake Hodges Bicycle Pedestrian Bridge from out your car window while riding on the 15 freeway in Escondido. It's an impressive sight, looming above the water. At 990 feet in length, it is the world's longest stress ribbon bridge. It was created in order to provide a scenic passageway for families

and cyclists between the north and south ends of the lake. In total, the trail is a leisurely 3-mile trek. An added bonus: Lake Hodges is a popular location for migratory birds traveling on the Pacific Flyway, making this bike ride ripe for birdwatching. Bridge gates are open 6am to 9pm daily.

Solana Beach Coastal Rail Trail

SOLANA BEACH

The Solana Beach Coastal Rail Trail is an art lover's paradise. Sprinkled throughout with whimsical art installations, this 1.7-mile ride is an easy way to take in one of San Diego's funkiest little beach communities.



Pacific Coast Highway Bikeway

The Pacific Coast Highway Bikeway draws cyclists from around the world. Extremely adventurous riders take PCH all the way up the California Coast. But for a simpler day ride, start in Del Mar and make your way to Camp Pendleton and back down again. Most of the route offers dedicated bike lanes plus ocean views and breezes. It's the stuff of movies, or perfectly curated Instagram feeds. Make sure to bring along your ID, as you will not be permitted to ride through Camp Pendleton without a government-issued photo ID.



This follows a national craze that has spread across the U.S. in just four years. It's easy to imagine yourself heaving an ax as hard as you can in some cathartic act of pine wood destruction. Thro Co., points out that while throwing accurately requires solid core strength, it takes more finesse than muscle. Multiple leagues have already sprung up for those interested in tournament play, though if you just want to show up and compete, \$25 will get you an hour playing a game that's similar to darts, but more satisfying.



By forcing air up a tube at wind speeds up to 140 miles per hour, iFly indoor skydiving centers in Mission Valley and Oceanside simulate the conditions of a skydiving freefall, minus the fall. In fact, when you step into that tube, you don't fall at all, you float. The wind lifts you up so you may spin, flip, and dance on air. But don't expect to leap straight into aerial pirouettes. You can lose control with the slightest hand movement, so stable belly flying is the first of many skills you must

acquire before you may enter the tube without an instructor. That typically takes 30-40 flights, and since a pair of intense one-minute turns start at \$50, it takes true commitment and core strength to master one move that can't be replicated jumping out of a plane: flying! Fortunately, for an extra \$20, your instructor will help

you fly 40 feet to the top of the tube.

Lawn Bowling

El Prado at Balboa Drive

BALBOA PARK

An ancient game more closely related to bocce than ten pin, lawn bowling is what you may have noticed people playing just inside the Laurel Street entrance to Balboa Park. on the left before you cross the bridge. That would be the San Diego Lawn Bowling Club, keepers of the manicured pair of 120-foot square bowling greens that have been in use since 1932, and which once hosted Queen Elizabeth. In return for upkeep, members gain access to greens and clubhouse, stocked with bowls: the 3- to 4-pound balls players roll with a swing-andsquat motion. Bowls bulge a bit on one side, so they roll with a natural curve. Rather than knock down pins, the goal is to curl your bowls closest to the jack, a smaller white ball rolled ahead down a 14-foot lane, or rink. It's \$219 to join, then \$4 to use the greens, but the club is planning open play events this summer to boost involvement in this engrossing game.

Morley Field Disc Golf Course

3090 Pershing Drive NORTH PARK

Throwing a frisbee becomes more active than you'd expect when you're doing so at a disc golf course. For example, completing the winding, 19-hole Morley Field course takes you on a several mile walk through trees, over creeks, and across grassy fields. Established in 1978, it was one of the world's first courses for disc golf, which operates much like regular golf, except the "holes" are actually pole-mounted baskets. Every hole here is a par 3 or 4, and the baskets are frequently moved so the course stays fresh, even for frequent players. It's \$4 to play all day (\$5 on weekends), and while you'll notice experienced players drawing from a quiver of a dozen or more frisbees - each suitable for different throwing lengths and trajectories — newbies can make do with a \$1.50 rental frisbee. Dogs are allowed, on leash.

Iyengar Yoga

(VARIOUS LOCATIONS) Not all yoga is alike. All my early yoga classes were vinyasa, an active flow style that coordinated breath and movement for a very physical workout. Bikram, better known as hot yoga, proved even more intense, in a heated, sweaty studio no less. Kundalini was lighter, but I found the chanting and meditation trying my patience instead of relaxing me. Finally, I landed on Iyengar, the bowl of yoga porridge that's just right. It's a more gentle form that focuses more on alignment and balance. You may still build strength, but using walls, ropes, blankets, blocks, and straps, the poses of an Iyengar class are more about stretching you out, improving your posture, and bringing both sides of your body into harmony. There aren't many dedicated Iyengar studios in greater San Diego, but when you find one, classes hover around \$20 each. Well worth it to walk out of class feeling taller.

Nobel Canyon Mountain Biking

MOUNT LAGUNA

Located in Cleveland National Forest, the Nobel Canyon Trail runs from the top of Mount Laguna all the way down to Pine Valley. It drops a whopping 2244 feet in elevation in just a hair under ten miles. You are starting at about 5515 feet and end at 3733. Near the top, the ride is filled with singletrack trails that weave riders through thick enclaves of pine trees. The terrain transitions to chaparral about a third of the way down and becomes somewhat rocky and treacherous as sections such as the legendary "Stairway to Hell" begin to appear. The bottom third is primarily sand and rocky desert terrain that isn't too far removed from parts of local rides such as Tecolote Canyon and Mission Trails. A full-suspension mountain bike, a helmet, and confidence in your abilities are all recommended for this epic ride.

Mission Trails Rock Climbing

MISSION TRAILS REGIONAL PARK

If you want a more proximate (and easier) alternative to climbing Half Dome in Yosemite, look no further than Mission Trails Regional Park. Besides being perhaps the best dirt trail hiking and biking option within city limits, the park has a dedicated climbing area to satisfy those who yearn to scale large rocks. If you enter the park on the Father Junipero Serra Trail from Mission Gorge Road, the climbing area is located up the hill to your right, just after you pass the Visitor's Center. There is an official "Climber's Loop" trail that runs alongside the climbing area as well. On many days, you can see the climbers scaling the rock walls from the Father Junipero Serra Trail. The west-facing mountainside is divided into three different climbing areas (Main Wall/ Limbo /Middle Earth), and each offers a selection of climbing routes. If you are heading out in the hotter months, bring plenty of water and keep your eyes peeled for the local rattlesnakes. They love the rocks as well.

options for adults (vollevball, soccer, and tennis, among others) nothing is quite as much fun as the silly throwback kickball leagues. Dodgeball comes close, but the sheer anger and head-hunting associated with the gameplay of that sport makes it seem more appropriate for endlessly enraged adults circa 2020. Kickball, at its core, is athletic competition in its most dumbed-down and participant-friendly form. It's baseball and softball minus bats and, more often than not, skill. I played in one of these leagues a while back; it was stupid fun and a great excuse to get a little exercise on a weekday evening. Registration is as low as \$80 for an eightgame season.

Sweetwater Bicycle Jump Park

Del Mar got a concrete pump track in 2019, and

early this year Bonita opened its very own bicycle jump park. These are good days for area cyclists looking to push their skills into the airborne region. The new Sweetwater park is all dirt as well, so the cyclists won't have to worry about skateboarders crowding the space. As far as features go, the park has jump lines that range from beginner to expert, flow trails, and skill and pump sections. There is also a dedicated kids' section to help future X-Gamers get their tail whips down. The park sits on four acres of land and utilizes a packing material known as Soil-Tak to help keep the dirt on the berms and jumps as close to the smoothness of concrete as possible.

South Mission Beach Volleyball

MISSION BEACH

The courts at the southern end of Mission Beach are an incredible place to play volleyball. Besides the gameplay, you have an ocean to cool off in just steps away and, if you linger into the evening, epic sunsets at your visual disposal. Players with incredible skills use these courts, but if you are just lingering and looking to get into a game, you can usually find a crew in the beginner to moderate range. If you have a large crew of your own, the best bet is to arrive early and try to stake out your own court. Remember, Monday through Friday after 10 am, all courts must accept challenges. Anybody who wants to play gets to play. Just make sure you're ready for the deep and potentially burning sand. It can toast your feet and swallow your jumps.



After 3-5 minutes spent grappling with an opponent, you'll be left physically depleted and mentally invigorated, having used most of the muscles in your body, including your brain. Beyond physical fitness, Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu will teach you the "gentle art" of protecting yourself against someone who is bigger and stronger.



Arce and Juan Carlos 'Diablito' Nuñez are retired soccer players who helped take Xolos to the Mexican championship in 2012. They are now frequently spotted playing in a non-professional setting. "It's not only the retired pros that make it competitive, but a lot of teens from Chula also come to play," continues my brother. The





league takes place in the field behind the stadium where the Xolos team usually practices. The full field is divided into three smaller fields to make matches of 7 vs 7. Matches cost around \$23 USD per team to pay for the referees. League winner not only takes the trophy but also scores a cash price.

Surfing Baja

SOUTH ROSARITO

The first time I surfed was in Baja back in 2010 with two out-of-work pilots from Hawaii, friends of my brother. I didn't know anything about Baja then and neither did they; we simply drove south. Past Rosarito, we found a small gated beach that seemed nice. We paid 50 pesos (\$2.50) to park and to use the shack-like bathroom. There was absolutely no one but us, the ocean, and the gatekeeper with his family. Turns out we were near one of the many famous surf spots in Baja, K-38, named for being near the 38 kilometer marker on the highway. Despite having worldwide recognition, surf spots in Baja remain mostly empty. When crossing the bor-

der, you only see one or two cars that have surfboards on their rooftops. That means that dozens of spots are open, spots such as Punta Abreojos, Cerritos Beach, San Miguel, Baja Malibu, and more. It's easy to find an Airbnb in any of these locations and spend days surfing without much wave competition.

Public Tijuana Sports Complex

Multiple Locations

TIJUANA

There are a couple of dozen sports fields spread throughout the city, managed by the Instituto Municipal del Deporte en Tijuana (IMDET), the branch of government in charge of sports and activities. They are all free, except for minimal parking fees. Places like La Benito, a small sports complex with baseball fields for minors in which home-runs cross over the border, or "El CREA" the biggest sports complex, which includes an Olympic-sized pool, fullsize fields, everything for track & field, but only one gated tennis court. It's situated on the Vía Rápida on the way to the San Ysidro Ready Lane. For tennis, I found "La Veinte," a large complex situated next to Tijuana's jail. It houses eight tennis courts, four cement basketball courts. eight handball courts, two pools, a baseball field, a soccer field, and a bunch of stray dogs (that love my extra tennis balls).

The first time I stepped foot inside this TJ bowl-

ing alley, a live banda was playing on a stage in the middle of lanes 14-18. Everybody was drunk and dancing, which made the pins fall by themselves. I'm not sure if they switched management, but it's different now. I've been going almost every Thursday for the past year, and now I mostly encounter serious bowlers. The graphics on the screen are still from the late '90s but the lanes are polished, well kept, and they are always making small improvements. The biggest advantage is the price. From Monday to Friday, three lanes go for 200 pesos (around \$11 USD) with the shoe rental included. The best offer is three hours for \$8, valid only Monday to Wednesday from 9 pm to midnight. This being the only bowling alley in Tijuana, the tournaments get competitive.

ZONA CENTRO, TIJUANA "I'm just training my security guards right now," says Brandon Gushiken, a Hawaiian retired MMA fighter living in Tijuana. He opened a fight gym in Colonia Libertad in 2012 but shut it down to spend time at the bar he opened in 2018 in the middle of Avenida Revolución. Behind blue curtains from the main bar, a fight club scene is revealed. Amateur MMA and boxing fights take place every month inside a caged octagon or a classic boxing ring. When there's no fight going on, the ring stays up. You are welcome to climb in the ring, put on comically oversized boxing gloves, and fight your buddies to get the blood flowing before a night out in Tijuana.

ob Marley is everywhere. His music, his reggae colors, and his face in a picture with Makeda. "He was my friend," says Makeda. "I produced his concert here in 1978. I was young, but I got to know him well."

This is around 5, Sunday afternoon. We're at the World Beat Center, inside a circular space that was once a million-gallon reservoir on the edge of Balboa Park.

I had been heading down Park from the Prado when I noticed people at tables and stalls outside the Center. One was a table laid out with herbs, another was groaning with hundreds of earth-crusted mushrooms, some labeled with Latin names. And from the glowing space inside, reggae music and spicy aromas. Turns out it's mushroom day here, run by POCFC.

"People of Color Fungi Community," says a gal who sees me puzzling in front of the sign. She's sitting at the fire ring. "Mushroom collectors. They've come from as far as New York. Brought their mushrooms with them. But some we just found on a walk right here in Balboa Park."

We're standing in a courtyard of tents, an outside pavilion, and a fire ring.

Why POCFC? "We pick mushrooms with a different attitude, like part of the decolonization movement," says another guy next to me. "Not to pillage the land, but to be respectful, become part of the cycle. Mushrooms have so much to offer us. We look to the knowledge of the Kumeyaay people. Because this land is Kumeyaay Territory."

I see I've missed a lot. Talks have been going on all day, like on fungal life cycles, on decriminalizing psychedelic mushrooms. The upside is that right about now, 5 pm, the non-paying general public can come in, look around, and eat.

The World Beat Cafe is inside, open every day



(except Monday). It promises a menu that's "healthy, natural, vegan, with fresh ingredients from our garden," and where nothing costs more than ten bucks.

Four ladies are working behind the counter: Berenice, Makeda, Tamiel, and Jesimarie. Makeda is the founder of this whole place. Behind them is this leaded glass sign: "The Prophet. International Vegetarian Cuisine."

"I started that restaurant too, in 1971," says Makeda. "It was the first vegetarian restaurant in San Diego."

The World Beat Cafe is on one side of a meeting space that's been invaded by stalls selling herbs, remedies, clothes, and Native American gear like dreamcatchers.

And hey, most interesting of all, the people. "We're not living on earth," this guy Anthony's saying. "We are earth."

He has just won a big fat paperback on mushrooms. He lands it on the counter as he waits for his favorite eats, chili with plantains. Meanwhile, I'm looking at a big tower of pink Himalayan salt, and smelling wafts of curry and coconut from the warmers.

They have a daily printed menu Scotch-taped to the warmer table. "Mushroom barley soup, \$6," it starts. "Shiitake mushrooms sautéed in garlic 'butter.' with salsa. \$6."

They have lots: a shiitake mushroom "cheez" burger (\$6), a veggie coconut curry with plantains and rice for \$8.50, or chili and rice with chips (\$6). They also do Jamaican patties (\$4.50) and tofu hot dogs for \$3. Such great prices.

Or, you can have just about all, with the one dish that is over \$10: the combination of all four daily entrees, like spicy Jamaican red curry, costa chica chili, Louisiana Creole gumbo, and African peanut curry. It's \$12.

Then I see the shiitake burger. Oh man. Just the glowing golden bun. Got to have that. Can take leftovers home.

Berenice hunts down a burger while Makeda scoops in chili, mixed veggies like kale and zuc-

chini drowned in a coconut curry, and two more I'm not sure of, all mixed in with basmati rice. Then she hauls a couple of slabs of golden fried plantain out of a warming pan, and adds different kinds of bean sprouts. "It's important to eat live food," she says. It is all coconut-and-plantain sweet and currily interesting. I can taste ginger in there too. It all seems healthy, and probably is. Everybody around here's obviously committed to the vegan/organic ethic. They even do their own composting.

ter. My curry combo is delicious, but I leave space for the burger. I haul it over to a table in the main auditorium. Somebody onstage is drawing a raffle for artwork prizes — art done live here today, I think they're saying. Meanwhile Berenice has organized an organic kombucha (\$6). I like the winey, fermented taste.

But now Makeda comes up. "Here, try this. Very good for you."



What \$12 buys: my four-entree combo.

She gives me a cup quarter-filled with this hot liquid. I sip. Ach! Bitter! "Mushroom tea," she says. "Disease preventers. Bad guys can't grow in an alkaline body. Bitter is good. Besides, there is cinnamon stick in there."

The food champ has to be that burger (\$7).



Patty and "cheez," totally vegan. All is organic.

The actual patty is caramelized shiitake mush-room and wheat and barley-based "meat", under Daiya vegan "cheddar," plus pickle, red onion, and tomato, all packaged in a crispy-shelled dark pretzel bun. Tasty! I end up eating the whole thing.



Greenspot proves you do make friends salad

The Greenspot Salad Company; 2075 Camino De La Reina Suite B., Mission Valley.

As I drove into Mission FEAST! Valley to try Brown rice, spinach, and shredded kale topped by assorted wraps, and grain bowls. veggies, buffalo chicken breast, and tahini dressing.


out a new salad restaurant, I found myself two kinds of conflicted. On the one hand, this was fast-food territory, which didn't augur well for my well-being. On the other, I was about to eat a salad for lunch, which didn't bode well for my happiness. This wasn't tricky calculus: the odds were long that I would enjoy The Greenspot Salad Company.

> And yet, ten minutes later, there I sat, chomping my way through a seven-dollar Caesar salad, strangely satisfied by a bowl featuring little more than

> > romaine lettuce, parmesan shavings, and croutons.

It probably bears mentioning up front that, contrary to its name, Greenspot Salad Company does not restrict its menu to salads, or even to vegetarian fare. The menu includes grass-fed steak, antibiotic- and hormonefree chicken, and seared ahi tuna; these proteins are mainly applied to salads,

And though the layout of its order

and prep counter resembles that of a Subway or Chipotle fast-food restaurant, it's probably more appropriate to call Greenspot fast casual, if only for the lack of microwaves and deep fryers in its kitchen. But also because the place prepares everything from whole, unprocessed ingredients, all the way down to its house-made salad dressings. It even claims to buy organic and locally sourced produce when possible — they told me the salad spring mix is always organic, and since all orders are assembled to order, it's easy to ask about other ingredients as you go.

Getting back to that Caesar, the house dressing doesn't include the traditional raw egg or anchovies, so it stood zero chance of being a true standard bearer for the classic salad. But that didn't stop me from emptying my bowl, and happily calling it a light meal.

Most times, however, I demand something a little more substantial, and that brings us into the semantics of the "bowls" on the menu. As with the salads, several signature recipes are available, along with the option to create your own. Some of the signature offerings correspond

between menus. So, for example, the \$8 Ensenada salad tops romaine and spring mix with corn, roasted red pepper, and avocado, with an optional \$4 steak add-on. Meanwhile the

\$13 Baja bowl incorporates several of the same ingredients, but serves it over your choice of rice.

Whichever bowl, wrap, or salad you order, the exact same

assortment of ingredients are culled from the exact same stainless steel bins, forcing the conclusion that a "bowl" is a salad served over rice, or quinoa, if you prefer.

I can get behind this mental trickery if it helps me eat better. I decided to put together a custom bowl, which starts at \$8.50 for greens and grains, plus four vegetable ingredients, and three or four dollars to add on a protein. I chose the buffalo chicken add-on, and quickly lost track how many veggies I was choosing, so I got a few extra at 50 cents to a buck apiece, landing on a \$13 total. Atop organic spinach, shredded kale, and brown rice I added roasted red peppers, roasted carrots, steamed broccoli, chickpeas, edamame, and (for some reason) alfalfa sprouts.

The rice was served warm, the rest of the ingredients cold (which confirms my salad versus bowl theory), but paired with sesame-rich house vegan tahini goddess dressing, I enjoyed a substantial, filling meal that tasted fresh and good. The only bigger surprise to me was that Greenspot isn't new. The local business launched

nine years a go in Sorrento Valley (9450 Scranton Rd #112, then followed up

Rd #112, then followed up with a second location four years back in 4S Ranch (16625 Dove Canyon Rd #109). Only this Mission Valley location, which opened in December, is new.

So to recap, I supported a local business, ate healthy, fast-casual salads, and drove away happy from Mission Valley. This must be a leap year.

my cup. I've stopped in for a drink at The Cat Cafe, where as many as 12 cats may be lounging on any given day, available to pet, play games with, and if a connection is made, adopt.

On the outskirts of the Gaslamp Quarter, across Third Avenue from the Horton Grand Hotel, Cat Café operates like a normal coffee shop if you want it to. Walk in the front door and veer right, and you'll find a short counter offering espresso, tea, soft drinks. cookies, pastries, and pre-packaged sandwiches. If that's all you're after, there's a patio out front, with shaded tables that prove a chill downtown spot to while away blue-sky days.

However, if you're here for the cats, paying an \$8 flat fee nets your choice of drink or food item, plus a half hour in the cat room. If you're especially serious about it, you may reserve an hour of time in advance: pretty much the same deal, but for \$12.

The room is half furnished with human furniture, half with a combination of cat towers, scratching posts, and

wall mounted beds. The cats lounging in this environment have been rescued by nonprofit The Rescue House, and every one is available for adoption, to the right home. A binder lists each cat by name, along with stories about where they were found or where they might have come from, and other

info, such as whether they're known to be compatible with kids, live well with other cats, or have been socialized with dogs.

For example, my new friend Casanova is a fouryear-old short hair lazing in his favorite spot, near the top of a palm tree-shaped cat tower near the center of the

room. He'd been adopted through Rescue House as a kitten, but the family he's grown up with moved into a new home and he didn't acclimate well to the new digs.

More playful during my visit is three-month-old Flora, a gray and orange tabby found scavenging the streets of Tijuana with a couple of her littermates. After I use my iced tea to coax her through a small play tunnel, she studies me with pale green eyes. I didn't come here looking to adopt - like most of the guests here, I'm mainly looking to casually meet a few cats while I caffeinate, then see where things go. But when you meet an adorable kitten such as Flora, it's tough not to consider filling out an application, and hoping your home is a good fit.

Still, my favorite today has to be Raylan, a fouryear-old gray and white male reportedly rescued from a home of 30 cats after their owner entered treatment for mental health issues. The

A taproom for ginger beer fans

Beer and booze tasting rooms are responsible for turning an obscure hilltop of Miramar warehouse suites into the small business cooperative dubbed the Miralani Makers District. So when visitors see the signs for Preston's Ginger Beer, the district's newest taproom, it's understandable if they walk in thinking they'll be getting an alcoholic ginger brew.

"They do," remarks namesake owner and operator Harry Preston, though he points out most stick around a while after finding otherwise - to relax, try some ginger beer, and maybe sober up a bit. "They just come in and do a reboot," he says with a laugh.

Technically, there is a tiny amount of alcohol in his ginger

beer, though at less than half a percent, it's negligible enough to qualify Preston's as a soft drink. However, this is a brewed product, containing esters and other fermented flavors that distinguish it from most national ginger beer brands found on store shelves. "A lot of the ginger beer companies out there, they don't ferment," Preston explains. "They add ginger juice to soda water. We actually ferment our ginger beer. It's ginger beer, not ginger soda."

An avid skateboarder and mountain biker, Preston first traveled to San Diego from Johannesburg to explore the local skating scene, and wound up meeting a local woman in Ocean Beach. They eventually married, settled here, and started a family. And family is what started him brewing ginger beer in 2013. "It all started off with my daughter," he says. When she developed a taste for the stuff, it sparked a memory. "My grandmother used to make ginger beer in South Africa." He got her recipe, and started tinkering with it at home. "Then I had friends come by asking for ginger beer for their weddings and events," he recalls. "It just kind of snowballed."

In 2014, he started the business part time, scaling down the sugars in his grandmother's recipe to produce a drier brew for a more modern palate. He sources all organic ingredients, including ginger root, lemons, turbinado, and cane sugar, and brews with reverse-osmosis filtered water

to create as clean a beverage as possible. Until recently, Preston's produced 15-gallon batches out of a commercial kitchen in Mira Mesa, selling it in hand-filled bottles to local shops, bars, and

limbo's grocery stores. But by moving into his own dedicated brewery in Miralani, he can now brew in a 5-barrel tank, scaling up production enough to meet rising demand. Beginning this week, for example, bottles of Preston's Ginger may now be found in Gelson's Markets: 27 locations throughout Southern California.

But Preston's favorite part about investing in a brewery has been opening a taproom. "We had a place to produce it, but no one could

really come and see and hang out and talk to us about the ginger beer," he says. It's a simple space, with reclaimed wood behind the bar, and a small lounge area in the corner, but like the adult

> beverage businesses of Miralani, it provides an affable environment where people can talk about the flavors in their brews.

Customer interaction gives Preston direct feedback as he experiments with brewing flavored ginger beers such as blood orange mint, honey lavender, a surprisingly well-rounded fig and honey. He says customers have returned to buy growlers of an aromatic passionfruit ginger beer, and he's currently experimenting with additions, including CBD, pineapple, and hops. He already has plans for a winter seasonal featuring

cinnamon, clove, and vanilla.

He also makes ginger beer mocktails to keep it fun. Though, this being Miralani, one needn't go far to find a boozy cocktail featuring Preston's Ginger, Like several bartenders in town, the resident craft distillery has discovered how well the stuff works as a mixer. "We have Swinford Spirits right behind us," says Preston, "and sometimes they come in for ginger beer to make mules."

When Lund's "Reflection" dropped on YouTube and SoundCloud four months ago, I couldn't decipher his style of music. The 2:47 song begins with a bass guitar rhythm reminiscent of the Bully video game theme song, then followed by an acoustic guitar as Lund begins to sing:

I look in the mirror and I hate my reflection watch hands move on the clock type his name with the stylized " \mathcal{L} " on a Google search. I ended up copying and pasting "Lund" and the stylized "L" remained intact.

"Robert Lund, mostly known as Lund, is an up and coming SoundCloud artist that has recently gained fame with his songs "Broken" and "Alone" released in 2016," posted Abraham Tse on the Genius.com site. "Lund is a cloud rapper, characterized by hazy vocals, emotional lyrics, and dreamlike beats."

Genius com savs it's a "source of music knowledge, created by scholars... from around the world, who share facts and insight about the songs and artists they love."

Tse's description of Lund was upvoted over 100 times. The more knowledgeable and better articulated posts regarding subject matter receives upvotes from the other users, and if another user surpasses Tse's upvotes — he or she will garner the 'genius' title on explaining who Lund truly is.

with minimal to no captions, and apparently his low-key demeanor adds to his appeal: per multiple compliments from his female fanbase.

"These lyrics cut to[o] deep, it's kinda scary how relatable the lyrics are," said a female fan. "Beautiful song — keep going Lund."

Many others wondered when "Reflection" would drop on the Spotify app — which will allow listeners to download the song in higher 320kbit/s sound quality.

On Lund's other tracks, he's got that emo-rap vibe like on "Nintendo" from his 2018 BLKBIRD album - which according to Genius.com, features the lyrics:

Super smash hoes, super smash hoes I should be sponsored

by Nintendo Maybe if I Googled Lund with a regular "L", more info will surface on the singer — I mean how did people learn



"Google pretty much treats "L" identical to a normal 'L," said Steve H., a Lund fan and search engine optimization specialist from Chula Vista, "there's no difference in the search for either of the spellings on that."

Warm up tour Rick Froberg and John Reis have spent most of their adult lives playing together, from Pitchfork in the '80s through Drive Like Jehu, and then Hot Snakes, which Reis formed while his band Rocket from the Crypt was between record labels and minus its longtime drummer. UMPHREY'S MCGEE at Observatory North Park

MARCH 12

When I first heard the music of Umphrey's McGee, it was on a radio station that failed to identify the band, leaving me to assume I'd just heard one of the best Rush tunes since "A Farewell to Kings." Imagine my surprise when I plugged a few of the lyrics into Google later that day and discovered I'd been grooving on a progressive jazz-rock fusion band from South Bend, Indiana named Umphrey's McGee, which I previously assumed from the name to be

just another folkie Americana group with too much banjo and not enough cowbell. Now that they've been around for over 20 years, with more than 2000 concerts to their credit, they've evolved into a Grateful Dead–like cult-rock road show that matches an immersive high-tech presentation with an old-fashioned gospel revival. Their most recent two studio albums were released several months apart, It's Not Us followed by It's You.



CREATURE CANYON at Soda Bar

MARCH 13

Featuring former members of Super Groupie and Viva Apollo, Creature Canyon describes its music as "Irish-American fiddle folk punk that's like Foo Fighters meets Flogging Molly, with a dash of Frank Turner and NOFX." Their debut full-length *Life I Know* — recorded with engineer Bryan Zullo at Studio West, Pacific Beat, and Steele Studios — was promoted with a single for the title track that was named a 91X Local Break song. The track, mixed and mastered by Grammy Award-winning engineer and producer Alan Sanderson (Rolling Stones, etc.), was also shot as a video by director Mitchell Harris. They won a \$2000

second-place prize at the 2017 San Diego County Fair's battle-of-the bands contest, and a seven-song EP was released the following year, *Did You Want That*. They're working on a new album produced by Private Island frontman Christian Lum, mixed and engineered by Mike Schuppan (Foster the People, Young the Giant). The bill includes the Jacks, founded by the late Beat Farmers guitarist Buddy Blue, which has featured at various times Jack Pinney (Iron Butterfly), Chris Sullivan (the Penetrators), and Mighty Joe Longa (Joey Harris and the Mentals).



DELTA SPIRIT at Belly Up

MARCH 14

Specializing in Americana-meets-Northern Soul, stirred up with old-school folk, Delta Spirit was essentially born when two members of Noise Ratchet came across singer Matt Vasquez busking at a local trolley station. They first garnered attention while touring with Tokyo Police Club, Clap Your Hands Say Yeah, and their Monarchy Music labelmates Cold War Kids. The group's rootsy debut EP ranked number nine on the Best of '07 list at the influential music blog *Daytrotter*. and they scored a minor radio hit with "Trashcan," though their onstage penchant for things like playing trash can lids as instruments during that track sometimes baffled audiences expecting FM radio

rock. They recorded an album in Julian, later picked up by Rounder Records, and made their network TV debut in 2008 on *Late Night With Conan O'Brien*. Their two-song set on *Jimmy Kimmel Live* can be viewed on YouTube, as can an appearance on the *Late Show With David Letterman*, and they played the 2011 Coachella music fest. The band hasn't released a new full-length since their fourth album in 2014, *Into the Wide*, which reached number 70 on the Billboard 200 chart, their highest U.S. rank to date. The scarcity of new material may be why they're calling this the Not Dead Yet tour.



JIMMY PATTON at 20/Twenty

MARCH 15

Escondido guitarist Jimmy Patton won Best Unsigned Guitarist in the Nation at the 2001 Guitarmageddon, a Guitar Center sponsored competition. He is renowned for his ability to play two separate guitars at the same time, playing both melody and accompaniment parts simultaneously. Patton has performed at music festivals in Hawaii and Colombia and has opened for Stanley Jordan and Terrance Blanchard. Aside from his busy performance schedule and recording albums for local label Pacific Records, the Chula Vista High alum — a married

father of a grade school-age son — is equally active with recording, arranging, and producing albums for other world-music artists. Patton frequently plays Latin jazz, blues, reggae, and funk at venues such as My Yard Live, Orfila Winery, and the Belching Beaver. He also has an acoustic duo with percussionist Enrique Platas, which was personally invited to tour Colombia by that country's government. They perform every other Friday at Cocina del Charro in San Marcos.



LEXINGTON FIELD at Casbah

MARCH 17

Formed in 2007, Americana fiddle rockers Lexington Field have recorded and performed their own takes on classic traditional tunes like "The Old Black Rum," "Pretty Irish Girl," "The Wild Rover," and "Molly Malone," as well as creating original songs such as "My Dream" and "City That We Love." Asked about the band's worst gig, singer-guitarist Beau Gray recalls the time they played a Firehouse Foundation Benefit Concert in 2010. "It was one of our first shows with Vince [drums] and Casey [bass] in the band, and our fiddle player Cami couldn't make the show. We put a sloppy mess of a set together, and clumsily made

it through an agonizing 30 minutes. Another musician from one of the other bands told us right after our performance, 'Nice set,' and Casey immediately responded, 'Want to get beat up?' It was so bad, but we did recover, and realized Cami wasn't allowed to miss any more shows." Cami Smith ended up taking a three-year hiatus, though she'd returned by the time they debuted a new holiday single last December, "Christmas at the Pub." The bill includes the Downs Family (mixing traditional Irish folk tunes with genres like bluegrass, polka, punk, and blues) and Action Andy & the Hi-Tones.

Close the orchestral petting zoo

Ah, the impermanence of all things. After the prior week's peak musical experience at the San Diego Symphony, we were bound to come down off the mountaintop. The concert on Friday, February 28, was good, but probably came off as less than it was because of its proximity to the previous concert.

The concert started with the obligatory 10 minutes of nonsense trying to pass itself off as legitimate concert music. I suppose that since it is being performed at a concert, it is "concert music," but that doesn't make it legitimate, in my opinion. Feel free to disagree with me. This time, the piece was Spin-Flip, by Texu Kim.

I would like to propose that contemporary composers be restricted from the use of the percussion section save for two pieces. Pick two essentials and let us hear what you can do without the whirls and rattles. I do not seek to offend members of the percussion section, but I'm afraid that's unavoidable. The orchestral petting zoo needs to be closed.

Next was the Sibelius Violin Concerto, a piece I have raved about in past years. But the fact remains: it is one of the toughest nuts to crack in the violin concerto repertoire. It is moody and episodic, and requires a violinist to go to those dark woods wherein the shadows dwell and stay there for a long, long time.

Violinist Nancy Zhou is an emerging artist. As a 21-yearold virtuoso, she has won a few competitions and is at the start of what could be an illustrious career. I do not

think she is ready to perform the Sibelius Violin Concerto. yet perform it she did. Zhou had all the notes but, to my ear and experience, she fell short of making a compelling case for why I should care about Sibelius's music.

I liken her situation to that of a young opera singer. There is a natural progression of roles based on the singer's abilities and experience. A 21-year-old soprano might have all the notes to sing the role of Bruhnhilde, but no one thinks she should.

Conductor Eun Sun Kim led the concert. She is the new music director of the San Francisco Opera, and her ability to coordinate the balance between the orchestra and a soloist was on full display. This is the most important skill an opera

conductor can have.

Maestro Kim kept the orchestra in check during the Sibelius in order to keep Zhou's tone present. This did lead to some rather muted orchestral sections, but that's the nature of live performance. The final piece of the concert was Rachmaninoff's Symphony No. 3, and Kim brought more energy to that piece. The problem is that it was Rachmaninoff's Symphony No. 3. There is

some commendable music in the piece, but it is something other than the Rachmaninoff we all know and love. The Third Symphony is what happens when Sergei tries to force a smile — when he is, in fact, a "six-and-a-halffoot-tall scowl," as Stravinsky styled him.

One final point: the symphony officially has a trumpet issue. More on that another time.

Charity and hope

The character wants love from a man, but the actress has to look for it from the audience.

ere, in the third show of its ninth season, the Oceanside Theatre Company decided to do something they hadn't done before, not even during their first-ever musical, last year's *Man of La Mancha*: big production numbers and set movements. Artistic director

(and play director) Ted Leib writes that he was inspired by the FX's TV biographical drama *Fosse/Verdon* to tackle *Sweet Charity*, the 1966

musical which Bob Fosse conceived and directed and choreographed, and in which his wife Gwen Verdon starred.

One of the remarkable things about attending community theater is the "community" part. You may, for instance, happen to find yourself seated next to the parents of lead actress Kalin Booker, and just in front of a woman who recalls seeing Verdon originate the role on Broadway, and who thinks Booker compares favorably. ("She's a triple threat!") And also next to a woman who has seen you scribbling notes through the first act and wants to know what you think.

Well, all right, what do I think? I get the triple threat comment: Booker can sing, even if the sheer size of the part threatens at times to overwhelm her and the sheer range of the songs pushes at the low end of her register. And she

can dance, even if she gets left alone onstage a bit too long in places. But what's more important is that she can act *through* the singing and the dancing. As the video screens on stage inform us, Charity is a girl who wants to be loved. The character wants love from a man (just about

any man will do, as long as he loves her, or even seems like he might be starting to be able to think about beginning to love

her), but the actress has to look for it from the audience. We need to feel her need throughout (not just when she faces us and sings about her romantic yearning): *love me*. *Please love me*. And Booker is up to the task: forever ingratiating, forever appealing, forever pleading. Some of the other actors can hold their own against her — notably Steve Lawrence as the nebbish accountant Oscar who gets stuck in an elevator with Charity at the 92nd Street Y — but it's always her show to carry.


The musical was based on Frederico Fellini's 1957 film *Nights of Cabiria*. There, the star is an Italian prostitute. Here, she's cleaned up into a dance-hall girl: still in the rent-a-body business, but without the ickier bits. But Neil Simon's book takes pains to assure that *Charity* is not a sweet show — if anything, it's even more mean-spirited

than the movie. At the film's outset, Cabiria is pushed into the river by a boyfriend who steals her purse, but rescued by decent ordinary people living downstream. In the play, the ordinary people are anything but decent: as Charity sinks into a city pond, they gather 'round, unmoved and unmoving. "I'll get my kid brother," says one woman, "he's never seen a drowning." Eventually, Charity is hauled from the water, but even then, it's only the local pervert who steps up to give





Parts of the show left me wondering. If community theater means bang for your buck, then yeah, you're going to want to include everything from the original, including the dance numbers from inside the swanky Pompeii Club that have nothing to do with anything but watching people dance. (This was a Fosse show...) And especially including the visit to a hippie cult masquerading as a church that opens act two. Back in 1966, that must have worked liked gangbusters to signify Sweet Charity's position on the cultural edge: not only are we featuring a romantic dreamer who isn't even a virgin, but we're also tossing in a bunch of hippies, who just might spell the end of civilization with their free love and their marijuana cigarettes. Now, it plays either as silly nostalgia (remember those goofballs?) or creepy weirdness (remember Charlie Manson?). Both the dancers and the hippies knew their stuff, but the show might have played better without them. (Other odd bits: a joke that relies on the idea that only foreign movies feature frank depictions of sex, a joke that relies on the audience knowing that Norman Mailer was a better novelist than poet, a joke that relies on it being shocking to hear a woman say, "Up yours!" The solid comedy of Charity is timeless, and there's plenty of it, which makes the dated stuff stand out.)

Because even without the extraneous bits, the company has succeeded in its effort to break new ground. The "big production numbers and set movements" work in nearly every instance. Charity's performance from inside a wardrobe as she watches a movie star play out a real life love scene may be the comedic high point, and the ensemble performance of "I Love to Cry at Weddings" does great, exuberant work in setting up the show's dramatic finish.



Burden: Raised racist

riter-director Andrew Heckler's *Burden* opens in mid-rage before descending into even more tumultuous turf. A sledgehammer shatters the lobby window of the Echo, a vacant South Carolina movie theatre. If the perps are of that variety

of aimless youth who get off on vandalizing abandoned property,

why were they joined by dad Tom Griffin (Tom Wilkinson)? We don't know until 10 minutes into the picture that these particular Griffins descend from that line of Lucifer known as the family of Klan. The building that once housed the Echo is being remodeled by Griffin and his Aryan proselytes into a KKK Museum, complete with a well-stocked gift boutique. After all, there are museums honoring Martin Luther King and Holocaust survivors, don't hate-mongering crackers deserve similar veneration?

Violence and profanity notwithstanding, the film takes an earlier-generation approach to its topic. Were it the '50s, Mike Burden's (Garrett Hedlund) story would have been serialized in the *Saturday Evening Post*, and its big screen adaptation released to theatres under the title, *I Was Adopted by the KKK*. A young Burden is practically dumped on the doorstep of the

hooded luminary who raises him as his own. Returning home from

active duty, the only legitimate work Burden is able to find was as a repo man at Rent-To-Own. Taken at face value, he's a rugged, good-natured sort, the type to give a gal a sweatshirt when the cool night air blows or refuse the advances of a "client" offering sex in exchange for a stay of repossession. But it's a different story if you are black and flashing a one-finger salute because you knew who it is driving the car behind you. In that case, Burden personally sees to it that those who fit that description get pummeled.

A tight, low-angle close-up introduces Reverend Kennedy (Forest

Whitaker) in mid-rail against 150 years of racial injustice. The shot cuts to find he's not behind the pulpit delivering a sermon, but rather in the break room of a big box store, trying to smooth things out between a rightfully disgruntled black customer and the employee who refuses to admit she gives preferential treatment to whites. Up steps Judy (Andrea Riseborough), the film's backbone, to issue a sincere, situation-smoothing apology "on behalf of all the cashiers in the world." It's on his way home from the mediation that Kennedy first catches sight of the Echo marquee's change of bill: "The Redneck KKK Museum."

And it's outside the Redneck Shop that the Reverend will spend much of the movie in protest. Most films of this race-baiting variety — and there are many — have little room for women, save for the homemaking/breedingstock variety typified by Tom's bride Hazel (Tess Harper). But instead of opting to let the brutes fight their battles until one inevitably comes to their senses and crosses over to the side of reason, first timer Heckler chooses Iudy as the cure for what ails a hatefilled heart. It turns out that before his mother abandoned her son, Burden was allowed black playmates. Judy learns of his sheeted-lifestyle from a

mutual friend, Clarence (Usher Raymond), and with full knowledge of his backstory, Judy accepts the family's invitation for dinner. Tom cracks an off-color (or in this case on-color) joke that causes Judy to flee the table. What kind of dinner convo did she reckon from this flock of Kleagles? Ditto her shock over his habitual use of the n-word. "What do you expect?" Mike shouts in his defense. "I'm with the Klan!"

His inevitable downfall is cushioned by a conversion to Christ, jump-started by an accidental encounter between Kennedy and a down-and-out Burden asking his former enemy

for a handout. Much to the shock and disgust of the Kennedy family, the Reverend invites the devil to live under their roof. There's not a bad performance to be found, most notably Riseborough's. There'll be no hiding behind the hoods for her. Burden is Klan and stupid to boot, but there's something about Judy's faith in the redemptive power that can reach even monsters that makes this chug. Plus, she's the only one capable of bringing a lighter moment to these dire proceedings. It's one thing for Judy to sign off on a fishing trip with her son and a Klansman, another for Burden to allow one of his black friends to join them. (Call it a moment of Clarence clarity.) Upon the trio's safe return home, Judy jokes that after spending the day with a black child, Burden should wash his hands before cooking.

Announced in 2015, completed in 2016, and previewed at Sundance in 2018, this is the first the film is seeing the projector light of day. A fact-based race drama with religious overtones makes for a lousy situation in Hollywood terms. But there's no such thing as a bad genre, just rinkydink raconteurs who take great pleasure in exalting the what before the how. Many are quick to complain that the film absolves a white supremecist of his sins. Burden ultimately does the right thing, but the chilling string of evil events that snowed under Burden's heart ultimately made it impossible to appreciate his extenuatory actions.

Fmma - This "Classics Illustrated" adaptation of Jane Austen is worth a look strictly for the performance of Anya Taylor-Joy, the baby moon-eyed wonderment so perfectly suited for the role, you'd swear she was born in 1815. Alas, actors don't make movies, directors do, and photographerturned-fledgling-filmmaker Autumn de Wilde never finds a tone of her own to set in this manicured ransacking of Wes Anderson and Sofia Coppola. The comedy comes at you cute and forced: characters move in unison or burble dialogue to get a laugh. The costumes are spectacular, which makes the superabundance of closeups all the more regrettable. Lit flatly as though the interiors have no roofs, yet there are times when the lighting doesn't match from shot to shot. Bill Nighy's performance is better suited to screwball comedy, which, come to think of it, would have been a much fresher approach to the material than anything in this halfboiled handling 2020. — S.M. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Extra Ordinary — Never has a title been so far off base. We open on a paranormal-detective VHS tape badly in need of tracking. Cute. Flash-forward a couple of decades to find Rose (Maeve Higgins) and her sister Sailor (Terri Chandler) looking down upon the grave that their father, the ghost-hunting star of the video series, currently calls home. Convinced that her paranormal

powers were a contributing factor in her dad's demise, driving instructor Rose is reluctant to save the life of a client's daughter, a virgin set to be sacrificed by Christian Winter (Will Forte), Winter, a washed-up rocker living off the rovalties of his one hit, is looking to use the event as an occasion to restart his career. Forte's (MacGruber) approach to comedy is limited to hiding beneath a funny wig and broadly overplaying. At best, this is improvised skit comedy at it worst. Lay the blame for on first-time writing-directing team of Mike Ahern and Enda Loughman. 2019. - S.M. ● (ARCLIGHT LA IOLLA)

Goodfellas - A strong contender as Martin Scorsese's most negligible, most dispensable, most redundant movie. Here we go again: the subjective tracking shot through a nightclub, the stack of goldie-oldies to be gone through on the soundtrack, the torturously repetitive dialogue ("fuckin' " this and "fuckin' " that). Yes, there's a new device to be tried out, too: the intermittent freeze-frame for comic-ironic punctuation - well, not exactly a new device: a New Wave device. Scorsese tosses in so many tricks that some of them will look new simply because they look out of place. But the real problem with the movie — beyond its untimeliness, its extreme tardiness, in the tramp-tramptramp of "demystifying" portraits of the Mob - is that too much of the essential information is gotten across through the protagonist's narration (with additional narration chipped in by his Jewish girlfriend and later wife), so that Scorsese is reduced to a mere illustrator, even a mere time-killing doodler. To be sure, a highly capable illustrator (helped immeasurably by colorful portrayals from De Niro, Pesci, Sorvino, and company), but never so incapacitated a movie man. The script, boiled down from a true-life, as-told-to book about a half-Irish Mafia informant, boiled down therefrom to an episodic and piecemeal mush, is not a proper movie script

at all. With Ray Liotta and Lorraine Bracco. 1990. — D.S. ★ (READING CINEMAS GROSSMONT WITH TITAN XC)

Hope Gap — The title serves doubleduty: a cove tucked under the cliffs of Seaford that bookends the action and that indelicate emotional space between exceedingly erudite lovers who have experienced their last gasp of romance. Grace (Annette Bening) is surprised to learn their son Jamie (Josh O'Connor) didn't call his mother to announce his upcoming weekend visit. He didn't have to, seeing how it was dad (Bill Nighy) who extended the invite hoping that the boy might stay a little longer to play intermediary in case Grace didn't respond well to the news their 29-year marriage was dissolved and that her husband had decided to play house with another woman. (His greatest mistake was a passive inability to stand up for himself.) She's not going down easy - it's a clause written into every one of the actresses' contracts, but seldom with Grace's ferocity. "What will he do if I say no?" Grace asks the divorce lawyer representing her husband. Let the stalking begin in this tense romantic drama that showcases both its leads in top form, 2020. — S.M. ★★★ (ANGELIKA CARMEL MOUNTAIN. LANDMARK HILLCREST)

Onward — A magical staff that once belonged to the deceased father they never knew is left in the care of geeky elf Ian's bothersome older brother Barley. But it comes with instructions that it be given to the younger brother on the occasion of his 16th birthday. and what's more, it comes with the power to bring dad back to life for a 24-hour period (and a premise that's too good to be true). Alas, Ian botches the reading of the magic spell; all he can conjure up is dad's lower torso. Instead of providing a pithy, Finding Nemo-ish examination of father and son relationships, the film slaps a leash on

dad's belt buckle and proceeds to hammer the one joke to death. It also raises the question: why animate when pretty much everything that happens in the opening third could have been achieved with live actors, a green screen, and a bucket of Max Factor blue? There's a bit of a reprieve when the fantasy elements kick in midway through, but all that leads to is a prolonged and tiresome third act chase. After Cars 2 & 3, and Incredibles 2, this is another slip on Pixar's downward spiral. 2020. — S.M. • (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Saint Frances — Bridget (screenwriter Kelly O'Sullivan) is a selfproclaimed agnostic feminist who's not quite ready to be a mother, or much of anything else for that matter. Given her admitted aversion to responsibility, a snarky aside aimed at the religious art adorning her potential employers' wall, and a pronounced eagerness to bail in mid-interview, it's a wonder that she gets the job nannying for a biracial lesbian couple. Any topic can be made funny given the right approach, even abortion and postpartum depression. The woman seated next to Bridget at the clinic asks. "Is this your first time?" The joke's payoff and the spoiler that comes with it gave rise to repeated slappings of the knee. Ditto the deployment of vaginal secretions as a running (runny?) gag that's bloody brilliant. First-time director Alex Thompson's normalizing drive to be all things to all people frequently does so at the expense of character development, and it wasn't until an hour into the picture and a meanspirited in-joke between nanny and her charge that one began to feel an affection for the duo. Still, imperfections can sometimes be beautiful. See this movie! 2020. — S.M. ★★★ (ANGELIKA CARMEL MOUNTAIN)

El Diablo Entre Las Piernas (Devil Between The Legs) (2019)

"What happened to us?" It's a question that many long-married couples don't prepare for, yet nonetheless, it has a custom of creeping up on them. Seldom has it been couched in deeper tones of disgust (charged with self-loathing and regret) than when posed by Beatriz (Sylvia Pasquel). The object of her abjection is a nasty retired homeopathic pharmacist who answers to the name "Mister" (Alejandro Suárez). All she wanted was for the two of them to grow old together peacefully, but some things aren't meant to be. The first person we see outside of the house is Dinorah (Greta Cervantes), the live-in maid who can't help but take sides in the couple's battles. (Where she leads wasn't where I wanted the story to follow.) Shot in widescreen and black-and-white, which allows ample space to accentuate the surrounding decay — the floating camera is given free rein of the house. The deliberate long take that opens the picture meticulously establishes the spatial and emotional boundaries between characters and their environment. Another question looms: why don't more directors include graphic scenes of rough trade romance between two very much sexually active 70-year-olds? Outsiders

look upon Beatriz as a decent woman, but in the eyes of Mister, yesterday's vivacious party girl is today's cheap whore. Perhaps Mister should have followed the advice of his mistress: the reason their affair worked so well was because she neither loved him nor cared about him. If it sounds like a series of relationships founded on garbage, it is. Call it the "unrath" (German for "garbage") of Arturo Ripstein, who must have caught The Blue Angel when it played TCM. In that one, Emil Jannings stars as Professor Unath, a prim disciplinarian who is literally reduced to playing the part of sideshow clown by a much-desired cabaret singer played by Marlene Dietrich. (That's Dietrich singing the film's signature song, "Falling In

Love Again," under the opening credits.) And look how far the incomparable Sylvia Pasquel has come from the Mexican wrestling pictures that first introduced her to movie audiences in the '70s. Performances don't come much more fearless than her Beatriz.

Sin Señas Particulares (Identifying Features) (2020)

During the reign of Ronald Reagan, with First Lady Nancy spearheading her ineffectual "Just Say No!" offensive, studios might just as well have flashed "Spoiler Alert" across the screen every time a character smoked a joint or snorted a line. Ingest drugs in reel one, and you won't live to see

the fade out. No matter how skillful a smuggler a director may be, so long as Trump remains in office, building a wall to keep immigrants out has replaced drugs as the new plot motivator for the narratively challenged. Occasionally, a director will cross the bridge and actually transform the material from a prolonged human interest story into something more artistically ensnaring. There's not a bad shot in this picture; at any given moment cinematographer Clarice Jensen knows precisely where to position the characters in the frame. (The shot of a world literally turned on its head must be seen to be believed.) And it shows a great deal of confidence when Fernanda Valadez, newcomer to film, takes her time firming up in the audience's mind what the film's central focus will be. It's not the two boys crossing the border to find work in Texas, who we're introduced to at the outset. Rather, their disappearance is what triggers the action. How about Miguel (David Illescas), who, after a five-year stretch in an American jail, is at last returning home? We're getting warmer. Of the two grieving mothers who pour through the victim identification book, it's Magdalena (Mercedes Hernández) who is given a sign of hope: an eyewitness to her son's disappearance exists, and she won't stop until he's found. You've heard of two characters forming an unlikely friendship? Both Magdalena's son and Miguel's mother may both still be alive. This is as likely a union as any you'll find.





smart home technology, "allowing the homeowner to control many features from a smart phone or tablet, including Lutron Lighting, Sonos Surround Sound, Amazon Alexa voice command, alarm system with a 'safe' room and pre-wired security camera options," along with automated window coverings and a five-zone heating and cooling system. The home is also pre-wired for a solar system and has a charging station for electric vehicles in the garage.

The project was completed by Pelican Development, a La Jolla-based luxury real estate developer boasting dozens of projects across the county. Originally purchased in 2018 for a reported \$1.8 million, the site was at the time home to a 3100-square-foot dwelling built in 1968.

With construction of the new home completed in early 2020, the property was re-listed for sale in late February. The asking price of \$8.95 million remains unchanged to date.■
