Harboring rotters Rancid red tide, slippery slipfolk

Starting on April 26, the water in the Oceanside harbor has taken on a rich brown hue. But while the coffee-colored water may look like a briny fecal stew, harbor fisherman explain that it has nothing to do with a busted sewer main or toilet flushes from the live-aboards who stay in the harbor year-round. "This is all because of the red tide," says Bruce Campbell, who has been catching shrimp, lobster, and crab for the last 50 years. It turns out the recent plankton invasion that makes for pretty, glow-in-the-dark waves at night also makes for a foul-smelling marina. "But it normally happens around July 4," says Campbell. "This year, with all the fresh water from the rain and the warm weather,



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and it killed everything in the harbor. You'd see all the starfish and lobster crawl out of the water and crawl up on the rocks to get away from it.... It wouldn't have been so bad this year if we hadn't gotten that last seven inches in one week."

Garner says that back in 2005, the live bait he caught and kept in containers alongside his boat, "died and turned into a milky lime green." Despite all this, Campbell and Garner Ted Schiafone says there are 850 slips for recreational boats, and about 85 are rented by people who are given year-round live-aboard status. The other 765 can stay overnight up to three nights a week. Based on rates provided by Schiafone, a live-aboard with a 30-foot boat would pay about \$480 a month in basic slip rent, and an extra \$114 because the boat is deemed a live-aboard. The permission would include two adults and potentially a child and a pet. The extra \$114 means they get free electricity and water, and may use the harbor's laundromat and shower facilities.

The county has mandated a shutdown of all recreational boating, which means all pleasure craft in county marinas cannot head out to sea. On April 22, Schiafone notified the 765 slip renters who are not permanent liveaboards that they could visit their craft in the daytime but that "due to all of the measures in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19, overnight stays are not permitted." Protest ensued. At an April 22 city council meeting, Councilwoman Esther Sanchez railed against the new temporary restrictions. "Folks who are slip renters who have the ability to stay overnight see them as a second home," she said. Indeed, one slip renter who is not a liveaboard tells me that in addition to the threenight-a-week allowance, they are allowed an additional "nine or ten three-night sleepover passes a year. And on top of that, they can buy what they call a hotel pass where they can stay an additional three nights a week for \$28."

The slip renter says that the harbor administration maintains a waiting list for slip renters who want to become one of the 85 who can use their boat as an apartment. "It takes like four to five years to get a permit," he says. Current live-aboards on the list can't transfer their live-aboard status to others by sale or by inheritance.


The Oceanside harbor administration uses a "key fob" pass that allows slip renters to open their gates. The pass is supposed to monitor the activity of all slip renters, but ome harbor regulars wonder how effective the system is. "I am not there a lot at night, but what I hear is that there are a lot of people cheating the system," says bait trader Garner. "I've heard it's been going on for quite some time. They are using all the live-aboard facilities but not paying the live-aboard fees. It's not fair to the others who live there legally and pay their share."

Harbor manager Schiafone says his staff does go after Oceanside's sneaky boat people. "It's those illegal live-aboards (sometimes called sneak-aboards) that create issues. The Harbor was never designed to handle them living at the Harbor. The electrical system that runs down each dock could never handle the demand. Our on-shore facilities are not built to handle more live-aboards than what are legally permitted. Many vessels are not equipped to live aboard, such as proper heating, cooking, or plumbing for sanitation. That is a huge safety and environmental issue. Illegal live-aboards are stealing a service from the Harbor."

(In order to keep poop and dishwater out of the harbor, Schiafone says all live-aboards are required to have a holding tank on their vessel, and that they can either use a harbor-supplied waste pump, call a service company to pump out the tanks, or take their boats out at least three miles and cast their waste to the sea.)

Some marinas do not allow any sleepovers at all. The closest marina to Oceanside is in Dana Point, 21 miles north. Officially, only 12 of its 2400 slips may be used for for sleepovers. And a woman who answered the phone there says the policy is to phase out all sleepovers: once the grandfatheredin 12 slip-owners pass, the slips will lose their sleepover status. Still, she grants that when it comes to sneak-overs, "We have a lot of those."

Pandemic vs. polystyrene Will coronavirus conquer environmental efforts?

As restaurants shift from dining in to takeout and delivery, coastal cities face are wrestling with an old foe: plastic. Encinitas is moving ahead with the last phase of its plastics initiative, which bans the retail sale of disposable food ware and other products made from expanded polystyrene (better known as styrofoam). Often used for carry-out, styrofoam's insulating qualities and low production cost have helped spread it across the food retail industry. But its frequent appearance at beach cleanups and the fact that it is not biodegradable have led to bans, including one in San Diego — though that was put on hold after a lawsuit was filed by restaurant owners, a container company,

Water washing worries

Will toilet-to-tap KO COVID-19?

Already under siege by cost overruns and litigious contractors, San Diego mayor Kevin Faulconer's \$1.4 billion plan to turn the city's sewage into drinkable water faces new doubts and questions of increased costs brought on by the global coronavirus pandemic. "Regulatory guidelines for virus removal in potable reuse systems

need additional review for possible more stringent requirements in the event of a coronavirus outbreak," says an April 2 editorial in the journal Environmental Science and Water Technology, co-authored by Haizhou Liu of UC Riverside's department of chemical and environmental engineering.

"For example, the state of California currently requires a 12-log removal of viruses during the entire indirect potable

treatment train." But that may not be enough in the face of pandemic onslaughts by newly evolved viruses, say Liu and co-author Vincenzo Naddeo of the University of Salerno's sanitary environmental engineering division, department of civil engineering. "Additional log-removal credit may be needed to protect public water systems in light of a virus outbreak," per the paper. "Preferential requirements for different viruses may be needed. Another important research need is a better understanding of the efficacy of emerging disinfection technologies for coronavirus

inactivation, especially treatment steps that are integrated into potable water reuse." Still another potentially expensive task in the age of Covid-19, according to Lieu and Naddeo, is to " develop new or upgrade existing water and wastewa-



structure for hot-spots that possibly receive coronavirus from sources including hospitals, community clinics and nursing homes."

Long controversial, the mayor's toilet-totap sewage reuse plan swept through city council after sponsors agreed to bar nonunion contractors from bidding on much of the job, thus gaining the backing of council **Democrats. The local Associated General** Contractors chapter subsequently sued, arguing that special state legislation to prevent non-union contractors from working on state-financed portions of the project was illegal. Authored by Assembly Democrat

Todd Gloria, a current candidate for mayor, and Toni Atkins, state senate pro-tem president, the fate of the bill is before a superior court judge, whose ruling is widely expected to undergo appeal regardless of the decision.

The legal wrangling is likely to add to the project's timeline and cost, which threatens to go skyhigh in the face of new treatment requirements brought on by the

Covid-19 crisis — which itself is spawning more varieties of disease with which to contend. Liu and Naddeo note. "As a preventative measure against the coronavirus outbreak, the public is significantly increasing the use of bactericides, virucides, and disinfectants to prevent a possible infection and is limiting travel and activities. This behavior affects our lifestyle and the economy, but from an environmental point

of view, it will increase the environmental presence of antibiotic-resistant bacteria."

Benign growth?

Multiplying expenditures reach troublesome levels at Cancer Center

As COVID-19 continues to ravage the world, officials at UCSD's Moores Cancer Center are no longer spending heavily on global travel and entertainment — at least for the time being. But just months before the pandemic hit, the center was called out by university

auditors for mismanagement of the state institution's official travel and amenity money by unidentified executives, including "a recently hired administrator."

"The objective of our review was to determine whether selected [Moores Cancer Centerl travel and entertainment expenditures were processed in compliance with policy, fund source restrictions, and budgetary requirements," says a December 5 report subsequently posted online by the University of California's Audit & Management Advisory Services unit. "A trip by the Administrator to

Viral influence peddling The

COVID-19 crisis continues to provide a cornucopia of new work for San Diego city hall lobbyists. Latest to benefit is the Intesa Communications Group, whose principals include Maddy Kilkenny, onetime aide to Republican county supervisor Greg Cox and ex-vice president of the downtown super-lobbyist Clay Company. Intesa just picked up SeaWorld as a client. A big local campaign donor, Kilkenny has given a total of \$14,475 to city politicos and their causes since

2011, with \$2250 provided to Republican mayor Kevin Faulconer, and \$1150 to the current mayoral campaign of Assembly Democrat Todd Gloria, according to data from the city clerk's office. In 2016 Faulconer named Kilkenny to the board of the now-defunct municipal redevelopment arm known as Civic San Diego. Her husband, developer Sean Kilkenny, came up with a total of \$3064, with \$1000 for Gloria.

Besides city matters regarding SeaWorld's "new masterplan," the aquatic attraction has tasked Intesa with lobbying "any and all decisions regarding COVID-19 response, reopening, and rent," according to the firm's new registration filing, dated April 21. SeaWorld has of late received notoriety as one of the big national companies seeking federal relief loans during the pandemic. "Over the past 10 years, records show SeaWorld Entertainment has earned nearly \$193 million in pretax profits. But it has paid less than \$8 million in total income taxes," per an April 29 Orlando Sentinel review of the company's financial statements. "That works out to a tax

rate of 4 percent — over an entire decade. Sea-

World's tiny tax bill is a result, in large part, of a multibillion-dollar private-equity buyout of the company orchestrated just over 10 years ago. When SeaWorld went public a few years later, company executives boasted to Wall Street that they weren't paying income taxes."

The company has reportedly furloughed 95 percent of its workforce but says it has enough cash on hand to survive through 2021, according to the Associated Press. On April 6, chief executive Sergio Rivera, in office for

just five months, abruptly quit following what were described as "disagreements with the board." Noted the Wall Street Journal, "executive officers are cutting their base salaries by 20 percent until its parks resume normal operations."

In an additional coronavirus-related move here, another registered San Diego lobbyist, the National Electrical Contractors Association, amended its disclosure of activity on April 21 to include the matter of "permit process under covid-19." Since 2007, three executives of the association have given a total of \$19,600 to city politicians, including \$1450 to Gloria's bid for mayor.

Lynched by coronavirus The death of Harland Svare, notorious in San Diego as losing head coach for the drug-addled Chargers of the early 1970s, is rekindling memories among old timers first revealed by team psy-

chiatrist Arnold Mandell in his 1976 tell-all,

The Nightmare Season. Svare, who died at age 89 on April 4 in a Steamboat Springs, Colorado nursing home of what daughter Mia Anderson told the Union-Tribune was suspected COVID-19, barely survived a stadium parking lot mob scene after losing 41-0 to the Atlanta Falcons back on October 21, 1973. "As I got to ground level, I faced a milling crowd of angry drunks, waiting for Harland," Mandell wrote of the near disaster. "I had

just reached my car when the mob stopped milling and turned as one toward the entrance to the underground lot. I heard Harland gun his motor a few times. I started back toward the crowd. Then I couldn't see much because they were surrounded ten or twelve deep by screaming, gesticulating fans



to keep from being knocked down and maybe trampled in the rush as the mob surged whenever Harland would gun the motor and inch the car forward."

Added Mandell: "The hood and trunk were pocked with dents. A clumsy drunk leaped on the hood and jumped up and down grotesquely, giving them the finger before he slid off." After a painfully long stand-off, "sirens announced that a couple

of police cars were on their way. Thank God." Concluded Mandell, "I just stood there for a while, trying to stop shaking, to get over the feeling that I had almost witnessed a lynching."

In June 1977, Svare told reporters regarding his disastrous tenure with the team, that "the problem was drugs, and nothing could be done about that. When you lose complete control, then continued on page 38

The Encinitas rules won't take full effect until October 20, to give businesses time to find alternatives, which the city has assisted with. But no one planned for a pandemic. Amid the coronavirus crisis, the state has suspended its plastic bag ban and fee, due to worries about contamination. And locals, once supportive of the plastics ban, may be reconsidering. "Please record my very loud NO to Phase 3 of the city's Plastics Initiative," one resident wrote in a letter to the city. Businesses "are going off a cliff."

August. The second phase took effect April 18, and prohibited plastic beverage bottles at city facilities and special events. Phase three, introduced last month, kicks in June 20, prohibiting the retail sale of disposable styrofoam foodware. It includes egg cartons and food trays, as well as coolers or similar containers not encased in hard plastic, and also foam packing materials. (The city's investigation into the local availability of foam products found that it varies: from retailers that don't sell any foam to those selling "a significant quantity of product.")

When Encinitas set its sights on plastic, city staff said business owners could charge diners a bit more to offset the higher cost of alternative materials. That wasn't

> a huge problem in the small, relatively affluent community. But San Diego's styrofoam ban didn't mental study. (City staff says they are



working on the documentation for the study pursuant to the settlement.) Still, for some small restaurants, the cost of alternative packaging isn't a deterrent. "We have been recycle-focused from the beginning of our restaurant project," says Pablo Rios, chef and co-owner of Barrio Dogg on Logan Avenue. "Our hot dog boats, side dish containers, and to-go bags are all made of paper products and 100 percent recyclable." Rios says the cost of the materials

they're using is much higher than it would be using packaging like styrofoam, but environmental responsibility is part of their quality standard. COVID has pushed the costs even higher. "Our operating costs have gone up since takeout and delivery went from being 15 percent of our business to now the only source of revenue."

Restaurants have had to close or lay off all staff. "Do NOT create one more barrier to obtaining cost-effective materials that will help these sectors get up and running as soon as possible," she said. "This measure, in particular, likely will affect minorityowned businesses disproportionately."

It's been nearly three years since Encinitas first banned the use of styrofoam by food providers for to-go meals. The city targeted disposable, single-use foam containers, from clam shells and cups to plates and trays. School districts' food service programs were exempt, and so was food prepared or packaged outside Encinitas. Last year, the city began working on a comprehensive plastics initiative. The first phase took effect February 22, and required that plastic straws and utensils be given out only if customers asked for them or if they were offered by a food provider. Straws were banned starting in 36-hour arrest for anyone caught on the Baja streets or highways

north towards San Ysidro and as they made the roughly 75 mile return drive back home to Ensenada. "The checkpoint is at El Sauzal (north Ensenada)," Reid told me on April 26. "They've moved it nearer to the toll booth. Its original location was causing

severe traffic backups. Apparently, the flow is better now."

On April 20, Armando Ayala Robles, the municipal president of Ensenada, restricted access to the port city - allowing only residents and travelers who have had an emergency, those with health issues or jobs, and those transporting food and medical supplies. "At the checkpoint coming into Ensenada, they ask for your ID," said

Alex, a Mexican national who drives trucks for an Ensenada transport company, "and if you aren't from Ensenada, and it's not for [the aforementioned reasons], they are not letting you in. They tell you to return towards the toll booth." (Some Ensenadans vehicle unless your temperature is higher than 37-38 degrees (Celsius)."

If you live in Ensenada and have a fever at the checkpoint, "you have two choices," Reid explained. "You can continue into the city and be subjected to their incom-



Have you noticed how, at the governor's COVID-19 press conferences, someone usually asks about how come unemployment benefits aren't reaching all the people who have applied for them? The governor takes time to explain how they're trying to catch up with the sudden swelling of the unemployment ranks, and how, just before the virus appeared, unemployment



"I don't buy that," says my friend Rob. He used to be in advertising, and then the surf-board business. "These days," he says, "I'm in the gig economy. The restaurant business. I had a bit saved away when this happened. But my coworkers all fell off a financial cliff. They're are hurting, bad.

"I started this folder the other day on my computer, after [EDD] hung up on me several times, after I'd been on the phone [trying to get through] 4, 6, 8 hours a day. Then I actually did get through. I got one of these wonderful ladies, a tech lady who was ordered

are not getting paid. They're not getting money paid into their accounts. The governor needs to, please, get the funds out to the people. Worry about investigating later, man. People need to eat. Maybe there are a few crooks in there. But for the most part, these are good people. They work hard for a living. They need their money."

Rob's starting to get emotional. "I'm just saying," he says, "people are desperate. Can you imagine? Hunger in

California, fifth largest economy in the world, home of Silicon Valley, because its government can't get its hands around the kind of accounting problem FDR was handling back in the 1930s?"

Ron's Garage

"It's very odd, being here playing alone in your house, with no audience, even though we know they're out there," says Ron Wheeler. Until the coronavirus, he led one of the best-loved cover bands in San Diego, "Ron's Garage," named after the "studio" they practiced in — his actual garage.


Now, every Monday night, Wheeler plays alone into an iPhone, giving a concert for his fans, everything from Neil Young's "Like a Phil Lean, bassist and singer. Lean's famous at McP's for his version of Led Zeppelin's "Whole Lotta Love," usually the finale on a Sunday afternoon. But he's also a music teacher at Francis Parker with a Ph.D. from UCSD in theoretical studies in voice, and has written music for movies such as *Indiscreet* and *The Beneficiary*. He was once part of a trio called The Self-Righteous Brothers.

Lean sets up his own iPhone studio in his guest room on the 12th floor of the Coronado Shores complex. He hangs the iPhone by a strip of Gorrilla tape. "We coordinate on broadcast days. Ron does his on Mondays 6-8; our buddy (singer/guitarist) Gonzo, Fridays, 5-7; and me Saturdays, 6-9. You have to play a lot of popular rock numbers. Between us, we've probably got 1000 songs down. But especially Gonzo and me, we'd get into more esoteric music. Nothing fancy. More like 'Reelin' In the Years' from Steely Dan."


Financially, Lean has his teaching job to fall back on. Wheeler has his Navy pension and his job teaching special ed. But a lot of their musician friends are not so lucky. They're facing desperate times. "That's why we give our tip money to fellow musicians," says Wheeler.

Technology makes this studio concert format possible. But even though listeners can "chat," request songs, and throw tips in the "jar," Lean says it's a lonely way of making music.

And yet one of their biggest fans — writer Joe Ditler, who tunes in to all three weekly performances — says they have saved him from the emptiness and depression this coronavirus situation threatens to inflict on so many of us. "They're a living connection to what I'm already calling the good old days," says Ditler.

to go to EDD to help them out. Absolutely wonderful person. She stayed on hold with me the whole time, trying to get through to EDD's department that handles basic claims."

He may make \$100 a night, via an electronic "tip jar." Not bad for a performance piped into your iPhone 11 from your house in La Mesa. "I've played McP's since they began in 1983," Wheeler says. "And the thing about that place has always been the vibe the kids — and their parents — give off, dancing and joshing and drinking away. They made us put the energy into our music."

Wheeler has been playing since he was a 14-year-old in Kansas City, Missouri. He came out of the Navy as a Chief Petty Officer. "I was an aviation guy at sea on carriers, fixing jet engines," he says, "but I've always kept up the music." So have his buddies, guitarist Claudio Martin, drummer Gary Taylor, and

Modern improvements to the home — originally built in 1987 as two units but extensively

remodeled as a singlefamily home in 2020 — include "fully incorporated smart home features" that "offer effortless living," while "access is easy for everyone," thanks to a commercial-grade glass elevator offering an alternative to the floating staircase for passage between the home's levels. "Entertainers will appreciate a chef-grade kitchen equipped with designer finishes and top-of-the-line appliances," as well as the game room, marble bar, and "director's theater" with seating for ten. There's also a temperature-controlled wine cellar with glass walls that "allow the stylish display of your private collection."

"Guests will be marveled by the seamless outdoor living and ocean view pool" accessed via a series of vanishing pocket doors that open up more than 800 square feet of covered outdoor living space to the interior. The vard also features a separate spa area and private putting green to alleviate any stress that avid golfers may be feeling from being kept off the links by quarantine. A three-car garage with wood-andglass custom doors adds to the outdoor parking space on the paver-lined, gated driveway.

The elevated master bedroom "feels like a resort within itself with a private veranda, massive walk-in closet, and spa-like bath with steam shower and ocean view soaking tub."


For those "with health in mind," the estate also includes "an oversized gym, dry sauna, and therapeutic steam room."

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don't recall when I first heard the word "prepper," but it was definitely derogatory, perhaps a step above — but certainly related to — "hoarder." A prepper, as I understood it then, was someone preparing for the end of the world, like in the early '60s, when bomb shelters came into vogue along with theories about Martians living among us.

It was a mere two years ago that I encountered my first modern-day prepper. He arrived at my door in the form of my neighbor, wearing camouflaged pants, combat boots, and a backpack he called his "bug out bag." He was ex-military and requested the use of my swimming pool for an experiment

he wanted to run. Once I agreed, I accompanied him to the pool, where he laid down his pack, removed his boots, and leaped into the deep end. Next, he unhitched his pants, tied the pant legs in knots and scooped air into them to make a float. Between gasps, he explained that he was preparing for the possibility of being lost at sea.

After drying off, he revealed the articles in his bug out bag to me. Among other things, there was a whetstone, flint, stick matches, duct tape, three sharp knives, a hand-crank radio, a water purifier, a thin plastic tarp, and a few rolls of quarters.

Once my neighbor left, I told my wife that his were the ravings of a combat victim

in need of treatment for post-traumatic stress. Then I ran out and bought a case of pinto beans, five gallons of water, and a 49-function Swiss Army Knife. To justify the knife's purchase, I told myself I needed it for camping trips with the grandkids. But the device sat buried in my desk drawer.

When the news announced a virus threatening our country, my thoughts on the matter were immediately divided. One part of me believed what I was told by the news, while another part flashed a newsreel of memories featuring SARS and Ebola, pandemics that probably took out fewer Americans than lightning strikes. Or so I half-reasoned while purchasing the last remaining pair of rubber gloves and a hospital mask. When nobody was looking, I took out my knife, oiled and sharpened the blades, and placed it in what can only be described as a bug out bag. And there, two months later, the knife sits, unused, patiently awaiting disas-

ter along with two boxes of stick matches, half a dozen candles, packets of dehydrated food, a handcrank radio, and a water purifier. I hesitate to name myself a prepper, but I must admit these preparations help me sleep at night.

When I went looking for my prepper neighbor, I found he had bugged out to a bunker in Arizona. Did he have room for me if "it all came down," as he warned it someday would? Were these the times he had warned of? I wondered while contemplating the thin line between paranoia and preparedness. Had I crossed that line?

Defining a prepper is difficult because there are as many types of prepper as there are disasters to prepared for. Some of the most common are earthquake preppers, bug out preppers, stay at home preppers, and doomsday preppers.

Some make the case that preppers existed long before there was a name for them. Anyone alive before or during the Great Depression behaved as preppers do in our day — if not before they stood in a soup line, then surely afterward. They came of age when self-reliance was common and government served as a sometimes necessary safety net when the crops failed. Your grandparents may not have been paranoid, but they realized that even a prosperous country could turn downward in the time it takes for a drought to hit.

Preparedness seems to have first gone into disfavor during the cold war era, when granny's root cellar was converted to a fallout shelter. Once the big one failed to launch, shelter builders were branded as weirdos, and the world was split into two unequal camps: the majority of the population trusted the doctor, the news, and government agencies to be truthful and protect them against everything less potent than death. The other camp figured the best defense against hardship lay at the end of their arms. The most extreme among their emotional descendants are what we now call...

Doomsday Preppers

"They laughed at Noah until it started raining." — Prepper proverb

After a mass catastrophic event, the earth may be repopulated by politicians who took shelter beneath the capitol, cockroaches, and doomsday preppers. While it seems unlikely that even

home address provides the city with a log of locals who might have the coronavirus. And while many Ensenadans grow uneasy or irate waiting in traffic to return home, others say it's worth the wait, and that the filter protocol is keeping the port city of approximately 800,000 lower in positive COVID-19 cases and COVID-related deaths compared to Mexicali and Tijuana.

As of this writing, reports show that Ensenada has 30 confirmed COVID-19 cases, and five deaths attributed to the virus; Tijuana has 737 cases and 120 deaths; Mexicali has 471 cases and 40 deaths. Expats are saying the numbers are low because of lack of testing facilities in those cities in February and March. Alex said he spoke with one of the soldiers during his 1.5 hour wait at the Ensenada checkpoint last week. "The soldier said the wait was long because an ambulance from Tijuana arrived at the filter station with cadavers; they [supposedly] died from COVID-19. And the ambulance driver was instructed by a Tijuana hospital to bring the remains into Ensenada for cremation purposes. The soldier [said they] didn't allow the ambulance in, and made the driver return to Tijuana."

On April 23, Rosarito-based American Diego Knight posted a video produced by his co-workers from the *Infonort* news outlet. It was a segment on "Chlorine Pa'la Baja," an Ensenada event held earlier that day where more than 400 vehicles were sanitized with about 200 liters of chlorine. The disinfecting event was reportedly held at an Ensenada fire station and in the recreational areas of a general hospital where patients with COVID-19 are treated. "It's more serious in Ensenada than here in Rosarito," Knight said. "There, from 9 pm to 6 am, there's a policy there deterring anyone from going outside of their houses."

The restrictions get tougher once you get beyond Ensenada into Baja California Sur. "Driving down to BCS at this time is probably not a good idea," said Reid. "BCS just instituted some crazy tough restrictions. One person per car, stay at home unless you must go out, no alcohol is being delivered to the stores, so once they're out, masks required at all times. Personally, I think some of it is a little overboard, but it's not my call. I'm just hoping they don't do that up here.")

As for Rosarito checkpoints, Knight says, "Going down the free road from Tijuana to Rosarito, there is a checkpoint; they ask why we are coming in, and check if we have a mask. We went through it today (April 26) and we had masks on, and no problem. And I saw a couple who were tourists in downtown."

Bonita C. is an expat who lives in

Ensenada; she said she recovered from a (self-diagnosed) case of COVID-19 in February. "I always cross at Tecate," she said to me on April 27. "I go through *Carretera Federal 3*, or if I go through Mexicali, I take 2D. Last time [I went to the U.S. and returned], there was one military checkpoint and they did not search or ask me for my temperature. I just opened my windows so they could look in."

Bad cough or bullet?

Amid illness and death, life carries on

My friend Mariana texted me a few weeks ago after I posted my story about the coronavirus piñatas. "You know my brother and I got it, right?" she asked. Mariana's brother Juan is my private doctor in Tijuana. (I'm not using their real names; they talked to me on the condition of remaining anonymous.) Juan's was one of the earlier cases confirmed by the government. (The rest of the party of six in the car got tested, but their cases were never reported.) "On March 15, we celebrated a small birthday party with my brother, my son, and a few friends. Everyone that was in the car when we went home ended up positive [for COVID-19]. Fortunately, my son never had any symptoms. My brother had a bit of a fever, but that was it. The other girls in the car and I had it horribly. My symptoms started with just slight headaches and chest pains, but it increased little by little to the point I thought, 'Am I going to die tonight?' Every breath I took was empty as if I was on the surface of the moon; the air felt non-existent. The cough, headaches, and fever didn't worry me; not being able to breath is the scary part. I went with every specialist I know. Since there is no cure, they just give you any treatment. Without complications or going to the ICU, I still felt like I was going to die for six horrifying nights. After those nights, I had a day of coughing blood and my symptoms started fading away. I'm only 33, I exercise regularly, I'm not overweight, I don't have any pre-existing conditions. It makes me sad to see that my neighbors don't care. They are still having their carne asada parties."

Juan told me that as of "April 21, Mexico was declared officially on Phase 3. I'm at the COVID filter outside Clinica 20 with IMSS. In Tijuana we have IMSS, ISSTE, and ISSTECALI; other parts of Mexico have more institutions. Each branch takes care of the different types of workers. At IMSS we take care of general workers (from

despite the stand's big sign declaring they only had orders to go. Confused by the question, I asked if I could eat my tacos there. The *taquero* told me they only had them to go and wrapped my tacos in tin foil. Just a few feet away from the stand, a group of people sat on a planter devouring tacos on plastic plates that were not to go.

As of this writing, there have been 222 deaths in Baja due to the virus. The daily news is dominated by corona, but there were 115 homicides in April, for a total of 560 through 2020. A narco tunnel was discovered in late March in the Otay region, along with nearly \$30 million worth of drugs. The Mexican peso is plummeting, hovering near the 25-pesos-per-dollar mark. Tijuana has the most cases, but the streets are not desolate. Activity is low, many businesses are closed, and those that are open have ropes around the perimeter to enforce safe distancing. All restaurant orders are to go. Yet people still cram themselves in public transportation; most wear masks, but gloves are rare. The old ice cream truck still makes the rounds around the neighborhood; so does the guy who sells tamales out of a cooler from his bicycle; and so does the beat-up car that drives around selling capirotadas. At every other corner, there are street salesmen offering disposable masks, washable masks with all types of graphics, plastic guards, gloves, and antibacterial gel.

factories, restaurants, etc.). But because of COVID, they mixed all the branches. In the tent outside Clinica 20, we check all the patients. If they have respiratory symptoms, we take them to the COVID consulting room; people without respiratory symptoms are sent home. Those who we suspect might have it, if it's not serious and they don't need ventilators, they get sent home. We don't test them. There is no need to waste resources on thousands of people, since we don't even have a way to treat them. Those that have serious symptoms get hospitalized. We administer the tests, and those cases end up reported."

IMSS Clinica 20 is situated near Mercado de Todos, an area usually bustling with activity. The market is closed, but there was plenty of activity in the area on a recent Thursday afternoon. The clinic had yellow precaution tape tied poorly on a railing. A big brown tent was set before the entrance with a big sign that read *Filtro* and posters depicting the cartoon anti-viral heroine Susana Distancia.

Half a block away from Clinica 20, I found a stand of *tacos varios*. As I placed my order, the *taquero* asked me, "para llevar?"

I have crossed the San Ysidro border three times since the quarantine started. The wait time was minimal, and border patrol only asked me if I was going to work. The lanes have been heavily reduced, but tourists are not allowed to cross until May 21. Citizens who cross the border for essential jobs report no changes in their commute. At the border, they sell facemasks. I bought six disposable masks for \$10 the last time I crossed as a favor to my friend Antonio Ley, who recently moved out of Tijuana to establish himself in San Diego. I caught up with him in Mission Hills to discuss the latest Tijuana news — more specifically, reports that east of Tijuana is not following the quarantine or the social distancing rules. "When people ask me about Corona in Tijuana, I want to show them the picture of the people eating tacos next to the dead body," says Antonio Ley inside his food truck, Corazón de Torta. "Do you think these people are afraid of a bad cough or a fever?"

The picture Ley mentioned depicts a family eating tacos next to a dead body; the photo was taken by Gustavo Suárez in 2018 for the *Frontera* newspaper.

Bay City Brewing pouring in East Village

I'm not saying we jinxed it, but San Diego sports were enjoying an uncommonly good year before all sports were canceled due to coronavirus. Aztecs basketball started 26-0 and figured to make noise as a top five team entering NCAA's March Madness tournament. Major League Rugby's San Diego Legion started the season a dominant 5-0. And since no one can factually dispute it, let's assume the Padres would have kept up those winning ways with a perfect home stand through April, right?

The postponement of baseball

has disappointed not only sports fans, but also East Village businesses. Downtown restaurants, bars, and breweries count on the Padres season like shopping malls count on Christmas. Not to mention Comic-Con and the regular convention center traffic.

For Bay City Brewing, a share of that scene was finally within reach following a long wait. Its Point Loma brewery has already proved a hit among sports fans — it sits across the street from the sports arena, home ice for the San Diego Gulls hockey team, and has become a de facto co-host on game nights. When the Gulls' seasons season was suspended on March 12, Bay City took a hit, but showed its resolve to stay open on social media: "We're bummed, too. Even though the fate of the season is unclear, we would still love for you to grab a brew with us."

The brewery posted a notice to customers pledging high safety standards, and followed up with an announcement for the grand opening of its new restaurant and tasting room near Petco Park, about 1900 feet due north of home plate. Crowned by a three-thousand square foot, indoor-outdoor rooftop lounge, Bay City's East Village investment was intended to open

March 16.

Instead, on March 16, Major League Baseball announced it would delay the start of its season for at least two months, and California's governor ordered bars and restaurant dining rooms closed

to the public. Bay City announced it would be "closed until further notice."

"We've been working on this project in East Village for two years," says Bay City cofounder Greg Anderson, who also operates McGregor's Grill near the Aztec's football stadium. "It took a year just to get the conditional use permit." Bay City did just manage to initiate a soft open phase for Bay City Brewing East Village (627 Eighth Avenue), but it didn't do much to show off the location's fourth story deck. "It rained for six days in a row."

The new outdoor pregame venue may have to wait, but Bay City has shown signs of a comeback. By late March it had reopened in Point Loma for beer to go, and on April Ja, it went ahead with an East Village opening: curbside takeout of pizza and beer.

Anderson says he and his partners weren't sure how effectively opening for the first time would work, but ultimately, East Village is a community they're excited to be joining, so they might as well be

there to serve the neighborhood, baseball or not. Sell some beer. Pay some employees.

"If payroll and sales are equal," says Anderson, "it's kind of a win."

San Diego Reader: How long do you spend writing your sermon?

Pastor Kurt Christenson: I was blessed to have interned in an African American parish in south-central Los Angeles. So my sermons are topica — the scripture has to come alive for today. It starts with a deep exegetical process,

but that would become a lecture without including the story of the people and how that story interfaces with the story of scripture. How does scripture form and shape us through its story? It's taken me 33 years to write my sermons - no, actually, make that 59 years. I usually set aside two big chunks of two days, but that's just the formal part of the preparation. SDR: What's your main concern as a member of the clergy during this time of pandemic? PC: Not much has changed for us, other than having to stream our worship services on Facebook from my house because there's too much echo in the church to record anything people can

hear. Here at First Lutheran, we have a ministry to those on the edge of society which we've been engaged in for 30 years, and really, in some form or another before that, for almost the whole 112year history of the church. We have to do it differently during this time, but caring for the needs of those at the edge of society has been a hallmark of this congregation. I arrived in September, so I'm pretty new here—and privileged to be here. The church started the Third Avenue Charitable Organization - TACO - and we had 160 guests for breakfast this morning whom we served. There are still people here for social work services and

to pick up their mail. On Mondays, we have dental, medical, and legal clinicand an acupuncture clinic. There are 300 souls a week who get taken care here each week. How to maintain that with social distancing and all these other things we have to do has been a significant concern.

SDR: Where do you go when vou die?

PC: Heaven. We get to go to heaven. I don't know if everyone goes to heaven but I'm so grateful that no human being gets to judge. God will be the judge. I have every confidence in the eternal, loving, graceful hands of God and his wide embrace of humanity and

of this creation that, thank God, he decided to make. He loves our stories and wants to hear our stories. I have a pretty wide view of heaven, and I'm grateful that eternity means having enough time to get things right. I'll be able to make amends for the all the relationships I screwed up and have enough time to

ones I missed. Also, maybe I'll learn to play the standup bass. But that's the mystery - how will people get to heaven? I'm happy to live in the mystery of what God has in store. I know there are people who want to have nothing to do with loving their neighbor in any way, it seems, or very little. I don't know - I'm grateful I'm not being asked to judge them, but God will. The same goes for me - I don't know if I'd be let in on my own merits. I'm grateful it all begins with unearned, freely given grace. - Joseph O'Brien

I glance inside. Looks so empty. Breaks my heart.

group of us sits, staring to the west.

"Is that one?" says Kelly.

It's sunset. But we're not looking for green flashes. We're looking for white flashes in the blue teeth of the waves. At night.

Every time a rack of rollers breaks, the spume lights up like the Border Patrol has shined a light through it. And on the big ones, it's an explosion of light. Incredible.

And edible, says this guy Joe. ED E
"These little guys creating the light
are algae, base of the food chain. They have lots of
antioxidants. Whales love 'em. Actually, plankton
eat these algae, and whales eat the plankton, right?
We should be in there!"

Hmm. Maybe not tonight. It's moot anyway, because I have these three boxes of nice hot food I've just brought out from "The Most Southwesterly Bar & Grill in the USA." IB Forum. They even give their exact latitude and longitude: "32 degrees, 34 minutes, 36.3 seconds N; 117 degrees, 07 minutes, 53.8 seconds W."

This really is the last chance saloon. It stands right before the street extension that runs between the Tijuana River sloughs and the ocean. If you kept heading south, next stop would be TJ's bull-ring. I want to recognize this place but don't. Great burger joint I've been to before. But somehow, it looks different.

"We've just put in this wraparound patio counter," says Connie, the manager. I've met her at the desk they've set up to stop us coming inside.

Connie says The Forum has been open since 1985. "Before that, it was some kind of biker bar."

I glance inside. Looks so empty. Breaks my heart. Connie points to the takeout menu on the pinboard. Reduced offerings, for sure. But still plenty here to choose from. Sports bar snacks such as potato skins (\$11), chicken tenders (\$10), fish and chips (\$15), a six-piece rib "starter" with fries (\$15), calamari and fish (\$15), or Philly Steak sandwich with sliced ribeye, peppers, grilled onions,

shrooms, and cheese for \$12.75.

I'm really tempted by the French Dip. It costs \$13.75, but for that, you get sliced prime rib and Jack cheese, plus *au jus* for dipping (and sipping), along with my fave unmustard, horseradish. And they offer grilled onions and

shrooms for \$1.75 extra.

Perfect combo for watching a sunset

phenomenon open-mouthed

Hmm. Best deal? Probably a cup of clam chowder for \$4.75. Or the buffalo chicken taco (\$5.50), or a grilled or fried shrimp taco for \$7. Top taco

dollar is surf and turf with carne asada and shrimp and white sauce and cheese (\$7.25).

But the point is this: it's just gotta be something nice and greasy and crunchy and warm to snack on while you're out there in the chill watching the blue waves crash.

"Any ideas?" I ask Connie.

"Well, our burgers

were voted 'best burgers' three years in a row," she says, though she doesn't specify by whom. "People love our grilled mushroom and onion burger (\$12). Or the Sunrise, with the egg (\$13). Or most of all, the avocado bacon burger (\$13)." She says some tourists from the Midwest in summer have never had avocado. "It's exotic to them."

"D'aagh, think I'll have your Forum Sampler, and the Aloha Burger, and, oh hell, a cup of clam chowder."

"We're out of clam chowder."

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Maybe just as well. Trying to balance that on a knee would be a mess.

"Cole slaw or fries with the burger?" asks Connie. "Or for \$2.75 more, onion rings or

house salad."

Hmm. Go for the healthy one, I think. "Salad," I say. Plus, I get an iced tea — even though they have everything from beer to takeout cocktails. But I can just see the interview. "I can explain it all, officer..." So I get an iced tea (\$2.16).

"Where can I eat this?" I ask Connie.

"Well, they haven't cordoned off those benches that look out over the ocean," she says.

Mmm. Yum. Twenty minutes later, as the horizon turns a chalky orange and blue, here I am starting with the tater skins (with cheese, bacon bits, green onion), and couldn't have asked for a less messy choice. In the "Forum Sampler," you get four potato skins, four hot wings, two chicken tenders, onion rings, plus — and these are vital — sour cream and ranch dressings. Fifteen bucks. Out here, picnic-style, they're all delicious.

One or two people are still surfing, and kids are chasing each other up and down the beach while grown-ups just saunter. A bunch of friends on the benches next to mine yak away, waiting for dark.

Pretty soon we're talking. Andy, Sally, Abbey, Cyrus, Joe, and Kelly among them. "We're here every night," says Javier. "We're the IB Boulevard Club, right?" He's just made up the name. The others agree to it.

I think of offering some of my food, but I guess

sharing's out. I've touched everything. I'm already staying at a kind of distance as it is.

But nothing compares to my Aloha burger. I know it's sort of uncool to like pineapple in a burger if you're a sophisticate, so guess I'm not, 'cause I love it. The pineapple is grilled, they've added a honey garlic glaze, and big fat bacon slabs surround the two pineapple slices. Oh yes. And the salad is surprisingly big and generous and fresh. I take a chomp into the patty just as Kelly pipes up. "Ooh, look. Over there!"

By now, it's dark enough to the south for a big rolling wave to light up blue, green, and white, like a snake afire under a sheet.

I swear. IB magic. I take one more bite from this magic burger, catch one more luminous wave. Then I'm up and heading north. All stocked up for tomorrow. ■

farmer stands, and no non-farmer stands. Any-

one who frequents farmers markets knows there's

a cottage industry of small — often extremely small — vendors that produce and sell artisan

foods. Local sauce makers, for example, such as

Majestic Hummus and Bitchin' Sauce. Or home

For such local food producers, farmers mar-

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Market Box delivers the rest of the farmers market to your door

Throughout most of the county, weekly farmers markets were initially shut down on March 13, while the first rounds of covid-19 restric-

producers can parlay the low start-up costs to sell at a market, and grow over time into a more traditional business.

It turns out one group of food producers didn't waste any time finding an alternative outlet for their goods. After learning the markets had closed on March 13, Jessica Davis, the founder of fermented food specialist Edible Alchemy, couldn't sleep. By 6 am on March 14, she'd reached out to fellow market vendor Amanda Waterman, of Double Batch Almond Cheese, with an idea. And by March 15, Market Box was making its first deliveries.

It turns out, says Davis, "You can get a lot done

when you're working 22 hours a day!"

Davis and Waterman quickly set up a website to collect online orders, established ultra-sanitary processes for local pick-up and delivery, and reached out to fellow market vendors to offer an alternative way to distribute their products.

Six weeks later, Market Box represents nearly 50 vendors, and delivers as far away as Los Angeles.

Market Boxes go out twice a week: Sunday and Thursday, with the cut-off time for orders 6:59 pm the night before. Despite a \$15 fee, Davis tells me the majority of orders opt for delivery, many to customers who have completely quaran-

tined themselves at home due to compromised immunity, or other vulnerabilities to coronavirus. Those packing and delivering boxes do so wearing gloves, masks, and hairnets.

I made the decision to pick up my order, and found it to be the most socially distant pick-up I've made since the pandemic began.

First, it required driving to El Cajon. That's where Davis opened a co-packing commercial kitchen last May. Called Vegan Kitchen Collective, it's where she, Waterman, and other small food producers prepare their goods. It carries all of the permits necessary for Market Box to operate.

I pulled up to the industrial suite (1100 N Magnolia Avenue, Suite D) to find a short line forming outside, spread apart by Xs marked on the ground in blue tape. Once it was my turn to enter the suite, I stood on another X, while a gloved and masked man on the other side of the room unloaded my items, one by one, onto a table, so I could see everything was there. Once confirmed, he left the room, and I walked over to load the products into a bag I brought with me.

Of the dozens of vendors featured, a key anchor is JR Organics farm, which means customers may stock up on produce when ordering a Market Box. I picked up an order of microgreens from Quantum Microgreens: the living greens (including micro broccoli, arugula, pea shoots, and more) in a shallow container continue to grow on my countertop until I cut them for dinner.

I picked up a loaf of sliced bread from North County bakery Prager Bros., which I've been using to make grilled cheese sandwiches with some of that Double Batch vegan cheese (grated pepper jack). It doesn't melt as quickly as actual cheese, but I can promise you this: it tastes a lot more like cheese than it does like almonds.

It probably bears mentioning that every one of these vendors is entirely plant-based, so don't expect any dairy or meat products. But those hardly seem necessary when there are so many vegetables, breads, tortillas, dips, sauces, sauerkrauts, coffees, teas, and juices. I managed to get a can of Modern Times cold brew coffee, and bottle of Cascaraa probiotic tea.

And don't forget the desserts. The chocolate dipped vegan cookie from Alfa Alfajores, with a dash of sea salt and the tang of orange zest, is something I'll definitely go looking for once the farmers markets are back in full force. Though, even when that happens, Davis suggests Market Box might just stick around for good.

Spring in my Corazon de Torta

It was about three years ago next weekend that I got my first taste of the Corazon de Torta food truck. It was parked towards the back of the *Reader*'s Tacotopia taco festival, but buzz had already reached the front gates by time I walked in. Don't miss it, friends and colleagues warned me, Stand in line, so worth it.

They were not wrong.

There's no taco festival this spring, for obvious reasons — we're hoping for September — but with our outdoor spaces beginning to open up, it felt like a great time to track this truck down, and enjoy my own little taco celebration.

In one sense, food trucks are ready-made to survive the sort of restrictions we face during the current health scare. They have lower overhead costs compared to restaurants leas-

ing by the square foot, fewer employees (if any), and they serve take-out by default. However, in practice, most food trucks count on doing business at popular gathering places — outside brewery tasting rooms, at public markets, and parked at the numerous special events our sunny city would normally be hosting every weekend this spring. Obviously, crowds have dried up everywhere by gubernatorial edict, so many food trucks have no place to go to attract customers.

Better positioned to survive are the trucks that park in the same leased location each day. But even those are experiencing dramatic drops in business. I've always had to wait ten or twenty minutes in line at the *mariscos* truck in the South Park Target parking lot (3030 Grape Street). Last week: no line at all.

A similar situation across

the street, next to The Bottle House liquor store (3012 Grape Street, South Park). In January, the Shawarma Guys food truck that started parking there last summer was named the number one restaurant in America, according to Yelp. Overnight, I watched that truck go from serving three to six customers at a time, to being surrounded by crowds of 15 to 20. In April: down to a trickle. That's got to hurt.

Maybe that changes now that more people are beginning to emerge from their homes to visit public parks and beaches. I used a few personal errands as an excuse to get myself in the vicinity of Corazon de Torta. The truck has bounced around over the years, most often doing business near brewery tasting rooms, from Societe in Kearny Mesa, down to the breweries and bars on Third Avenue, Chula Vista.

Under current circumstances, Corazon de Torta has settled on two regular, weekly homes: Friday and Saturday outside of Fall Brewing Company (4542 30th Street, North Park), and Tuesday through Thursday in front of the Klover cannabis dispensary, (3500 Estudillo Street, Mission Hills). It parks both places at 11 am, and continues till 6 or 7pm.

I found it in the Klover parking lot and picked up four tacos for my one-man Tacotopia: carne asada, al pastor, cauliflower, and chicken. Say what you will about the mood-enhancers sold inside the dispensary, but there's no doubt eating street tacos put a smile on my face. Even behind the mask.

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

AB 5 pay cuts When California enacted Assembly Bill 5 at the beginning of 2020, the music industry braced for a heavy shake-up. The law created a new standard

(known as the ABC test) that employers would have to meet to hire workers as independent contractors. If they failed to meet these standards and misclassified their employees, they would be liable for the error.

The bill was primarily marketed as a means to get gig economy companies, such as Uber and Lyft, to offer better pay and protections to their workers. It cast a much wider net, though, as the law pertains to all independent contractors.

Many professions with lobbying power received exemptions from the start. These included doctors,

lawyers, real-estate agents, commercial fishermen, and architects. Not included on this list: musicians.

Mathew Rakers falls into this category. He runs a Mira Mesa-based business called The San Diego Music And Art Company that provides "comprehensive and high quality music and arts education to students of all ages while supporting a growing network of skilled professional musicians, artists, photographers, and writers."

Originally all the instructors were hired as independent contractors. AB5 changed this. "I had to hire on everyone as employees," Rakers explained. "Everyone took a pay cut. It's pretty common that people are either hiring on the teachers as employees with pay cuts or they're just basically operating under the table now or possibly illegally and opening

themselves up to fines.

"That's really frightening, because none of these people are wealthy," he added. "It's a whole class of the economy that's like lower-middle-class

at best."

On April 17, it was announced that new exemptions for musicians would be enacted when the State Assembly reconvened in May. A press release from District 80 Assemblywoman Lorena Gonzalez, who authored the bombshell bill, states that "the amendments will preserve the ability for the following industry professionals to collaborate and contract with one another to produce sound recordings and musical compositions without application of the ABC test to determine an employer." These professionals included musicians, vocalists, producers, and engineers.

The amendments will also specify that unless a musical group is "the main featured act headlining at a concert venue with more than 1500 attendees" or a "musical group performing at a large

festival with more than 18,000 attendees per day," they will be exempt from the law as well.

The press release also listed specific music-related work that would continue to have employment protections under AB5. This included musicians performing in symphony orchestras, musical productions, and a "musical group regularly performing in a theme park setting."

Not included on either

list was music instructors. These and many other musicians will continue to work. albeit with increased uncertainty as they learn to navigate the world of AB5 compliance, exemptions, and potential punishments.

"I've been following it really closely now for about half a year," Rakers explained. "I would venture to say that some of my friends who are business owners have no clue how to deal with it and are taking the 'I'm gonna bury my head in the sand' method of dealing with this problem, because they don't

want to think about it. Those are the people I'm most worried about."

IMMORTAL BEAUTY

The primary function of classical music fans

There are some real concerns out there regarding the future of many classical music organizations. I don't want to come off as unsympathetic, but I believe the destruction of these organizations by the COVID-19 situation won't mean that much in the grand scope of classical music.

Organizations in large urban settings will continue to survive. I think the San Diego Symphony and San Diego Opera will be okay, but if things end up going badly, my personal experience of classical music will remain somewhat unchanged.

Many of us listen to classical music all day every day.
That habit is the primary

practice of classical music fans. Going to the symphony or opera is a secondary practice. Of the two, live opera has the most to gain over its recorded version.

If COVID-19 takes out our San Diego music organizations, my personal secondary practice will be to travel to LA. I used to regularly travel up to Los Angeles to go to the LA Philharmonic and LA Opera. I would rather travel a few minutes instead of a few hours, but without a local option, I'd gladly set out for concert experiences in Orange County or Los Angeles.

The one thing missing when listening to recordings is any sense of excitement in the room. There is no buzz in the air when watching

an opera on YouTube. It's a big loss, but I'm afraid this is going to be our reality for the foreseeable future.

Before the shelter-inplace order was put in place, attendance was down at the early March concerts I attended. Classical music audiences, as has been discussed to no end, tend to be seniors, and seniors are more susceptible to complications from COVID-19. Many appeared to be staying home based on the threat.

Are audiences going to come straight back to the concert hall? I'd like to think so, but I just don't see that happening. Ticket sales aren't the entire picture, but there needs to be an

> audience in order for any number of funding options to be viable.

Who is going to support concerts that have no audience? Without an audience, there won't be any funding — unless our local, state, and federal governments suddenly decide to channel significant public money toward classical music organizations.

Yes, the threat is real.



Will audiences risk attending live concerts post-pandemic?

The 2020-21 seasons are far from being secure for all arts organizations, even as the shelter-in-place orders are relaxed. Will audiences risk attending? That is the biggest question

I'm afraid I don't have any answers for how this will settle out for music organizations. I do know that my primary enjoyment of classical music will continue to be daily listening to recordings.



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Overwrought meets underripe

e open on a note of anticipatory anxiety: an offscreen voice awakens Karen (Otmara Marrero). Soft tones profess, "You're beautiful," followed by, "You're gonna break my heart." Other than an eager exchange with a pooch or a listened-to voicemail, this is the

only substantive dialogue spoken for the first twelve minutes of

the picture. Is the ominous coo spoken by a mother figure? Given the proximity of the lens, it could be a lover. Perhaps an older sibling or a close friend? In the case of Clementine, try all of the above.

Flash forward however many months to find Karen, alone in the same bed, gazing upwards. The crack in the ceiling expresses all we need to know about the uneasy voice that greeted us, the one belonging to Karen's recent ex, a celebrated artist known simply as D. (Sonya Walger). D's prognostic apprehension regarding her relationship with the much younger Karen proved correct, but Karen's not the type to take getting dumped quietly. A great deal of ground is covered in the concisely cut together montage that follows, beginning with Karen stalking D's residence.

For whatever reason — in Karen's mind, the selection is limitless - she decides to drive from SoCal to D.'s lakehouse in Florence, Oregon. Having missed the ingenious imitation igneous rock key hider on her first pass, Karen decides she has no choice but to break a window. A stroll around the grounds finds Lana (played with complexity by Sydney Sweeney), a young blonde, sunning on the dock behind the house. Karen thinks nothing of it and keeps walking. Later that evening, Lana shows up on her doorstep and cajoles Karen into giving her a lift in search of a lost dog. Big city Karen no sooner begins to question small town girl Lana's sanity — who asks a stranger to play dog catcher? — than the likelihood of the pup's name comes up. Who would name their dog Bingo? Only a celluloid canine answers to that handle, right? Even better than a screenplay that answers a question the moment it enters the viewer's mind is one that has the dog show up to reveal that B-I-N-G-O really is his name-o.

The struggling actress in Lana is instantly smitten with her older, cosmopolitan new friend from Los

Angeles, but Karen keeps her distance. (The closest they get to a kiss in the first hour of the picture comes when supercharging a joint.) In this May-December narrative, arbiters of morality and taste arise in the form of age restrictions and artistic callowness. It's a safe bet that at least a couple of

> birthdays can be shaved from the 19 Lana claims to have celebrated. And

when one look at a triptych of D.'s framed Rorschach paintings causes Lana to blurt, "I could have made them," Karen leaps to the defense of her ex with, "But you didn't." She then takes it one step further, calling the artwork more about the "emotion of the process than the result."

This brings us to the story that gives the film the title. An early childhood memory of Lana's: sitting lakeside, a tangerine extending from her middle finger. From out of the sky swoops a sparrow, eager to abscond with the freshly-peeled fruit. Worse than the blood drawn from the encounter is the absence of witnesses to corroborate her story. The scene ends with the first of two clementines to be tossed overboard. When the second mandarin hits the water, it acts to punctuate a chlorophyllin reevaluation from one of our leads.

The film's one big disadvantage is a score that sounds like watered down Bernard Herrmann being dropped on burning rocks. Still, here is a mystery, characterized by many of the contrivances associated with the genre, which one can nevertheless abide. Karen's search is not a matter of whodunit — we can all identify with the irrational thoughts (and even actions) surrounding a break-up. It's why these characters behave the way they do that gives the drama its force. When the gun Karen finds hidden in D.'s drawer upon her arrival at the vacation home does indeed come back into play, its return is powered by the logic of misdirected compassion, not contrivance. It appears that the younger woman Karen chose to rebound with is herself no stranger to breaking hearts. ★★★ -Scott Marks

Malkovich) and then partnered with blithesome jerk Swin (Clark Duke) to drive deliveries across state lines. (The opening passage had me hooked — or maybe I'm just a sucker for Malkovich.) Kyle's preoccupation with uncovering the identity of their boss, a pawn shop owner known only as Frog (Vince Vaughn), leads to a series of flashbacks that prove repetition is the key to learning. (The plot wasn't so convoluted that we needed a third act recap to bring a character — and by extention, the audience — up to date.) Relatively speaking, Duke had a meteoric spurt in movies (Superbad, Kick Ass, Hot Tub Time Machine) before settling into life on the small screen. For his directorial debut, the co-scripter and Arkansas native saw to it that Swin would be a change of pace from the pasty-faced nerds to whom we've grown accustomed. He should have spent more time on a co-star who supplies more of a deadpan table-reading than straight-out performance. Eden Brolin, Vivica A. Fox, Barry Primus, Michael Kenneth Williams, and Brad William Henke round out the firstrate supporting cast. 2020 —S.M. ★★

Dangerous Lies — New to Netflix: a television-tempered thriller in which the winds of mystery act as a vacuum to reasoning. Katie (Camila Mendes), a caregiver four months on the job, arrives at work to find her 88-year-old charge (Elliott Gould) dead in the attic. Before the meat wagon arrives, Katie and her always-around husband Adam (Jessie T. Usher) rummage through the old man's belongings and find a trunk filled with \$100,000 in scattered green. Adam returns to relieve the chest of its contents, only to be met by a blow to the head from a fellow home invader. Why didn't the clobberer abscond with the loot? Furthermore, upon regaining consciousness, why didn't Adam make off with the cash just as he intended? Try as director Michael Scott might to pin the blame for Gould's death on

Nuestras Madres (Our Mothers) — More than twenty years after the bloody Civil War in Guatemala ended, military offences are at last being tried before a criminal court. It is the job of Ernesto (Armando Espitia), a young forensic anthropologist, to exhume and arrange the skeletal remains of the soldiers, and to gather testimony from their widows and children. His mother Cristina (Emma Dib) discourages her son from wasting time trying to unearth the bones of the father he never knew, but Ernesto's gut indicates otherwise. The hunch pays off when a witness shows up holding a group photo that includes a man respectfully called "the Boss" by his underlings — a man who bears a striking resemblance to Ernesto's father. Does the snapshot indicate a soldier different from the hero who has been living inside his son's head all these years? In 78 minutes, first-time director Cesar Diaz's flashback-free narrative sets out a present-day story of quiet desperation and family entanglements with dignity and restraint. A silent montage of the worn-down faces of real-life survivors goes far to underscore the tales

of horror and degradation that women were forced to endure. Strong stuff for Mother's Day, but worth it. Now playing on the Digital Gym's Virtual Cinema. 2019. S.M. ★★★

Sword of God (aka *The Mute*) — In the Middle Ages, an unnamed stranger (Karol Bernacki) tends to the wounds of a recently shipwrecked bishop (Krzysztof Pieczynski). Sent on a mission from the King, the latter's task is basically to beat Christianity into the heads of the heathen islanders, with the alternative being certain death. The natives take target practice on the large wooden crucifix the bishop clutches in his hand, vet the newly-arrived pair are allowed to live. To suppress the race of medieval clay people and prove their resident diety a sham, the pious potentate emerges unsinged from a stroll through the flames of hell. Surprise: what sounds like Ming the Merciless' demise in a Flash Gordon serial is actually a mesmeric, wildly accomplished historical drama from Polish filmmaker Bartosz Konopka (Fear of Falling). The double-edged title alludes to one of our two leads having his lips sewn together, as well as the film's muting a chunk of audience comprehension by subtitling "human speech" and not the pagan chatter. 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Bright Idea

 As leaders worldwide search for ways to encourage people to stay home during the coronavirus pandemic, officials in Indonesia are taking advantage of its citizens' superstitions, Reuters reported on April 13. Kepuh, a village on Java island, is employing village residents to dress as "pocong," or the trapped souls of the dead, in Indonesian folklore. The ghostly figures, wrapped in white shrouds with their heads covered and dark-rimmed eyes peering out, surprise unsuspecting pedestrians, then disappear into the night. The strategy appears to be working: Villagers have been seen running off in fright when the pocong appear. "People will not gather or stay on the streets after evening prayers," resident Karno Supadmo said.

Names in the News

- A baby born on April 6 in Sheopur, Bhopal, India, will carry a special name with him through his life: Lockdown. Manju Mail, his mother, confirmed to hospital staff: "Yes, he is Lockdown, as he was born during the lockdown period." Her husband, Raghunath, told The Times of India: "It is a significant name. The whole world using lockdown as a means to stem this pandemic. We should not take Lockdown lightly."

- Similarly, in Chhattisgarh, India, another couple blessed their twins, born March 27, with timely names: Corona and Covid. Preeti Verma, 27, told the Press Trust of India her children's names symbolize triumph over hardships. "Indeed the virus is dangerous and life-

threatening, but its outbreak made people focus on sanitation, hygiene and inculcate other good habits," she said.

The Continuing Crisis

- Los Angeles County Sheriff's deputies responded to a home in Saugus, California, on April 7 after a dispute over toilet paper turned violent, CNN reported. A 26-year-old man was arrested and charged with battery after his mother told deputies he had punched her. Sheriff's department spokesperson Shirley Miller said the man had accused his mother of hiding toilet paper, which she admitted to deputies, saying her son was using too much. "This is the first arrest I've heard of that started out over an argument over toilet paper," remarked Miller.

Getting the Message Out

- Civic-minded car designer Kanyaboyina Sudhakar of the Sudha Cars Museum in Bahadurpura, India, has built a one-seat vehicle in the shape of the coronavirus "so that awareness can be spread on social distancing," he told *The* Times of India on April 8. The six-wheeled Corona Car can go about 25 mph and took Sudhakar 10 days to build. "I have always made cars to give back to the society in my own way," Sudhakar said. "(I)t is important to tell people to stay home and stay safe, and the coronavirus car is meant to convey the message."

Priorities

- As tornadoes bore down on the South-

east on April 12, an unnamed family sought safety in a storm shelter in Crossville, Ala bama, but said they were turned away when they had only one face mask. The woman told WHNT a man who opened the door asked if they had masks. "I said I have one mask," the woman said. "He motioned no and shut the door." The family ran back to their car and looked for shelter elsewhere. Crossville Mayor Tera Fortenberry had posted the face coverings requirement on Facebook, but the family didn't see the message. After the story became public, masks were donated to the town anonymously.

Inexplicable

- Davis, California, resident Shaun Lamar Moore, 40, was arrested on April 12 and charged with burglary after allegedly stealing a specimen that was waiting to be tested for COVID-19 from the Sutter Davis Hospital. Authorities said hospital employees reported a person had entered the facility April 11 and removed the specimen, Fox News reported. That evening, police were alerted that a sealed COVID-19 specimen was found in a shopping cart at a nearby CVS store. Police Deputy Chief Paul Doroshov said the specimen 'hadn't been opened or tampered with based on the security seals. ... Although the incident is very serious, detectives do not believe (Moore) intended to harm himself or others," he added.

- Kevin Fallon, 30, of New York City reportedly sent warnings to friends and family on Ápril 9 that he intended to blow up a bronze statue in Central Park depicting characters from "Alice in Wonderland," according to court documents. On April 11. he allegedly followed up with photos of a pipe bomb and ammunition, along with threats: "This is going to hurt. None of you are safe. I am lethal." At his mother's request, NYPD conducted a wellness check at his apartment that day and found three bombs, ammunition and knives that had been taped together, authorities said. The New York Post reported the bombs were found to be nonfunctional, and later that day, Fallon was found at a hotel in the city, where he was taken into custody and charged with making a terroristic threat.

Desperate Measures

- Olive Veronesi, 93, of Seminole, Pennsylvania, wasn't shy about letting loved ones know what she needed during the lockdown. "I need more beer!" read a sign she held up, along with a can of Coors Light. A relative posted Veronesi's photo to social media, KDKA reported, and her predicament went viral. "I have a beer every night. ... I was on my last 12 cans. You know what, beer has vitamins in it. It's good for you, only don't overdo it," Veronesi said. On April 13, she got her wish: Molson Coors delivered 10 cases of her favorite brew to her front door. Her new sign reads, "Got more beer!"

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

lies with an Encinitas-based limited partner-ship apparently set up for the express purpose of facilitating the home's remodel and resale, though time to bring the home to market has been a bit long. The Stratford estate last sold in May of 2015 for a reported \$10,250,000; the previous owners had sought a sales price

as high as \$13 million. Its current assessment of nearly \$10.9 million carries an annual property tax bill in excess of \$116,000.

After five years offmarket, the new and improved Stratford was re-listed in late April carrying an asking price of \$14,500,000. That price, which remains unchanged to date, is a full million dollars less than the last recorded mortgage against the home, which funded in 2017.

Your favorite rock star will be worth no more than the price of his leather pants, and the science nerd able grow anything edible will become the new sexy.

Jimmy Jack (not his

real name) is not a science nerd, and while I have not spoken to him directly or been on his property, other preppers gave a clear look into his personality while keeping his location secret. They describe him as slight of build, in his mid-60s, and, except for the weather lines on his face, able to pass for someone two decades younger. Like most doomsday preppers, Jimmy lives in an undisclosed location, which in his case means somwhere 40-some miles east of downtown San Diego in the recesses of the Cleveland National Forest. His bunker is clean, comfortable, and constructed almost entirely of rebar-reinforced concrete. They say he has enough guns and ammunition to conquer a tiny country, a deep well he dug himself, a solar generator he built from scratch and scraps, several sets of militarygrade binoculars, some night vision goggles, and a rugged off-road vehicle that, by their description, Batman

would envy.

Everyone in the family knows how to grow, trap, or shoot their own food with a rifle or a bow. Apparently, the girls, 9 and 12, are basically typical teenagers in some ways — with desires for cool clothes, play dates, and iPhones. While this puts them at odds with their parents, the family is united in its two main goals-survival and being left alone. To that end, the Jack home is camouflaged to appear like just another moldy old trailer set back from a country road. Apparently, Jimmy himself is ex-military, and his wife and children are all crack shots. The family's greatest communal fear is that the government will one day overstep its bounds and force them into what Jimmy terms "societal slavery," something he believes is already happening as "the masses exist in lock-step with the CIA-controlled entertainment industry." I am told he ends nearly every sentence with the words, "Better to die on your feet than live on your knees."

Who's laughing now?

"I am preparing for a worldwide pandemic; those who are prepared will survive. Those who are not will die." These are the words of Donna Nash, recorded before February 28, 2012, when she starred on the National Geographic channel's Doomsday Preppers. Seems prophetic now, but eight years ago, it sounded close to the fringe. As the current pandemic continues, masks and gloves are commonplace everywhere, but at the time of the Nat Geo filming. when she and her family wore such garb, they

looked mighty strange.

Bil Zelman is an urban dweller and one of the nation's top photographers. On video projects, he often collaborates with top-level videographer Jeycob Carlson. Zelman and Carlson work in a nonessential industry, and by their own admission are minor-league preppers. Zelman is what I would describe as passionate and peaceful by nature. He leans liberal politically, and so is an unlikely gun owner and hunter. Still, he uses a high-powered hunting rifle to take down his share of meat, elk being his most recent successful target. According to Zelman, "I'm a prepper, but so is anyone with a 401K. I'm not a doomsday prepper, because I don't think it's necessary or even possible to prepare for everything that could happen. To me, it only makes sense, however, to have extra water, gasoline, and some cash on hand in case of emergency." Zelman keeps 50 pounds of dried beans, a water purifier, and 30 gallons of gasoline at the ready.

Jeycob Carlson tends more toward the conservative side of the political spectrum and is probably a more serious, albeit less prepared prepper than Zelman. According to Carlson, "I keep thinking about building a bunker, storing a year's worth of food and having a bunch of





guns and ammunition, but I have four kids and all these items keep getting moved further and further down the list." Still, like Zelman, Carlson is better prepared than most, with a few months' worth of food for his young family to devour, just in case.

Lethal weapons

"They can have my gun when they take it from my cold, dead hand." — Popular 1980s bumper sticker.

It seems that few true preppers live without some sort of firearm. I recently visited Oceanside's Firearms Unknown, where I handled a 9-millimeter and a .22 pistol. I was leaning toward the .22, since it seemed less threatening than the 9-millimeter. But according to Unknown's media manager, Demetrius Karras,

"For home protection, the nine-millimeter is a better choice." He didn't say so, but it was implied that a complete novice like me would not be very accurate and that the 9-millimeter would help compensate for my assumed bad aim. As I cuddled the pistol once again, the words of pacifist John Lennon's song "Happiness is a Warm Gun" rang true in my ears. The gun provided a certain amount of comfort, and therefore happiness. I nonetheless resisted its pull and returned it to the case it came in.

Karras has the nononsense demeanor of someone who witnessed combat and served in the military for eight years. He is also one of the least paranoid people I have encountered during these days of plague. Almost as if to prove the point, he is one of the few I saw in public in mid-April without a particle mask or latex gloves.

Firearms Unknown sells guns and accessories at prices ranging from a few hundred bucks to over a thousand. The customers in the store at this moment range from a young man with the appearance of a father of two kids in little league to a camoattired Marine inquiring about part-time employment. All sales personnel are friendly and knowledgeable as they wait on the sometimes anxious customers. A dozen or so rectangular cardboard boxes line the floor, indicating a new shipment has just arrived. Kar-

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ras sees everyone from doomsday preppers to people who want to protect their families from a possible home invasion. The largest uptick in business is not from doomsdayers, but from those wanting to ensure nobody messes with the fam. He realizes he does encounter his share of doomsday preppers, but also realizes that they are hesitant to identify themselves as such. Most people who enter the store, according to Karras, are "looking for something for the immediate situation and are not stockpiling weapons." Perhaps ironically, I feel more secure in this gun store than I do on the street.

Another popular '80s bumper sticker read, "Guns don't kill people, people kill people." Almost as if reinforcing that thought, Karras tells

me of a knifing that occurred at his store a few weeks earlier.

Karras has seen live combat, but I have just met him and am uncomfortable quizzing him directly on how it feels to take a life. He rephrases my indirect question and puts it back on me, "How does it feel to kill someone? I've been shot at and I've shot people, but it never really bothered me." Of course, I have to ask how he deals with the threat of the coronavirus. He replies, "After being shot at it doesn't seem that threatening." Hoarder joke:

Q: Why did the hoarder buy so much toilet paper?

A: Because he's full of shit.

Continuing, Karras adds, "As for as being a prepper, I'm prepared, but not overly. Having a shopping cart piled high with toilet paper seems a bit extreme to me, because I think a shortage of items causes panic and it all begins to compound upon itself. Whenever politicians discuss limiting arms sales, a lot of people, myself included, have the reaction of buying more firearms to be grandfathered in."

In 2018, the US experienced 14 weather-related disasters where damage exceeded over \$1 billion. These disasters stretched across the country and included two cyclones, eight severe storms, two





winter storms, drought, and wildfires. When a disaster strikes, it's too late to think about what you should have packed to weather the storm, and before disaster strikes, it can be daunting to know what to include. Allinclusive kits are expensive and do not necessarily include items specific to you and your family. The basics iclude:

- Water one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation.
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food.
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert.
- Flashlight.
- First aid kit.
- Extra batteries.
- Sanitation needs toilet paper, soap, feminine supplies,

plastic garbage bags and ties, plastic bucket with tight lid, chlorine bleach

Tools and supplies

What you need can vary greatly based on where you live, the type of disaster you expect, and your family unit. Here are some basic items that most people will need in a disaster:

- Wrench to turn off gas and water lines
- Cups, plates, and utensils
- Light source (solar is best so you don't have to worry about batteries.)
- Manual can opener or a utility knife
- Small fire extinguisher
- Pliers
- Duct tape
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Plastic storage container to keep everything in one place
- Documents

In preparation, scan valuable documents and store them securely online so they can't be ruined by a disaster. It may be helpful to have copies of key items like insurance cards, social security numbers, passwords, and insurance policies in your kit as well. Take short videos to catalog valuables such as vehicles, computers, furniture, and artwork, for insurance purposes.

Key documents include: wills, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, passports, social security cards, immunization records, bank account numbers, credit card account numbers and companies, family records including birth, marriage, and death certificates.

There is a balance between being prepared and alert and carrying on with our daily lives. Keep particle masks at the ready and wash your hands. Perhaps equally important, however, is to use this time wisely. Play games with those you are confined with, learn an instrument or a new language. Build a bug out bag for yourself and your family. It might just make all the difference should you need to go on an unplanned camping trip.

an international conference included additional days at another international location, some of which may have been personal, which were not explained in the documentation," according to the document. "Other events indicated that the Administrator traveled a day early, without explanation of the business justification, and an airport meal which may have been unallowable per policy. Other minor arithmetic errors were noted."

In addition, "a duplicate reimbursement was made to the Administrator for one travel event totaling \$1,040." According to the audit, "the Administrator had not realized the discrepancy as she was under the impression that another travel event had been processed and the overall reimbursement amount for her events was close to her estimated reimbursement. Another travel event for the Administrator related to mileage for the Administrator's commute from her home (outside of San Diego) to UCSD, after she was hired but prior to her relocation to San Diego," says the report. "While the Administrator received relocation assistance as part of her offer letter, it did not specifically address commuting for this time period."

In addition to those discrepancies, the document goes on to say that auditors found "two instances where the same group of employees were provided with meals more often than once per month. Also, itemized receipts were not always submitted for expenses of \$75 or more. We also noted that business meetings were often held in local restaurants, which can provide the appearance that a University business objective was not the sole purpose of the meeting. "The meals were not consistent with university guidance, according to the report, which "states that business meetings between UCSD employees typically are held on UCSD property rather than in restaurants. Policy also sets limits on the frequency for providing meals to employees so that this is not considered a taxable benefit (meals should be limited to no more than once a month or twelve times per year, per group)."

A catered event held a year earlier held in association with what the report calls a Cancer Center Support Grant Site Visit also caught the auditors' attention. "In addition to the Site Visit held in October 2018, an External Advisory Board Meeting was held in September 2018 to serve as a 'Mock' Site Visit," according to the document. Combined expenses for both. including Event Production costs of \$119,274; Event Planning & Management services; \$33,456; Caterer, \$28,146; Branding/Graphic design, \$19,361; and Florist, \$14,772, totaled

\$235,818. "Certain aspects of these expenditures might raise question of whether the expenditure was the 'best use of Universityadministered funds' as indicated in policy. For example, the Caterer was based on the Los Angeles area, and the invoice included \$4,208 in travel, hotel, and per diem costs for catering staff. Payment of travel costs for a caterer does not appear to be prudent on its face, and the cost of production services appeared to account for over half of the expenses for this event (including a "rehearsal" at the [External Advisory Board | Mock Site Visit). While this may appear to be a high dollar figure, MCC leadership indicated that the business need for success at the event was high to secure future grant funding."

Interviews with cancer center staffers "indicated that there was some dissatisfaction with the local caterer at the Mock Site Visit, which prompted a lastminute change to another vendor which had been used by the Event Planner in the past, and had delivered high quality services on prior occasions "The interviews revealed that "event preparations evolved significantly in the several weeks leading up to the event, and logistical and other considerations resulted in escalating costs."

A December 5 memo from the university's Audit & Management interim director Christa Perkins attached to the document says that "because we were able to reach agreement regarding **Management Action Plans** in response to the audit recommendations, a formal response to the report is not requested." As a result, the report says, the university received a refund for the unnamed administrator's duplicate reimbursement and the cancer center "agreed to develop budgetary guidelines for future significant events with estimated costs above a defined

threshold and ensure management accountability for adherence to established budgets."

We are here for your enjoyment.


We are also keeping our staff employed with health benefits. We don't want to lose anyone during this crisis and leave them without work.
