

#### Classics in plain sight

A July 23 column titled "The good news in San Diego classical music" by Garrett Harris (Classical Music) failed to mention the classical music radio station in San Diego. What, you didn't know there was a classical music station in San Diego? Well, apparently KPBS, which operates the station, doesn't want anvone else to know about it either. It's a secret I accidentally discovered while scanning the monthly radio ratings several months ago. I contacted the station and suggested, at minimum, they mention this in their bi-monthly newsletter to members. Five months later, still no acknowledgement. In the latest audio ratings, KPBS-FM HD2 sub channel ranks number 28 out of 32 rated radio stations, so apparently I'm not the only one who discovered this. Classical music advocates will remember the 2018 loss of XHLNT (aka XLNT1 104.9) which morphed to rock. That station, based in Baja, suffered low ratings due to a signal which skipped over many parts of San Diego. The KPBS station carries programming from a service called Classical24.

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

#### **Covid kitties in crisis** Fears of feral fecundity, fatalities amid pandemic's procedure pause

KB has been helping feral cats for ten years. She traps them and then gets them spayed or neutered. Sometimes others in her rescuer network bring them to her. "You keep them in a separate room, you feed them, and play with them so they get used to human interaction," she says. "You take them to medical appointments to get their shots. There's a lot of cleaning. You have to do a load of laundry every day. When they are 8-12 weeks old or weigh over two pounds, they get spayed or neutered, and then they go up for adoption or get returned to the wild if they can't be socialized. I cry like a baby every time I let them go. Their quality of life is very poor. They live in terror and fear. They usually only last six months on the average."

KB doesn't mind being known as the cat lady. Or that her cat love is a drain on her resources. "I was always unpaid. I would always drive [the pets] to adoption events. I'd even make cat blankets and kitten hammocks." She is nothing if not devoted. "I was visiting foster kittens in [the Oceanside] cattery. I was concerned about this one little guy. I went to the front desk and I said, 'There is something wrong with so and so.' The kid says, 'We don't have time right now. I said, 'This is an animal that needs taking care of right now.' At which time, he told me 'You're a crazy foster.' That was ten years ago, but it still sticks with me that I was viewed that way by a shelter employee." KB says the incident "opened my eyes" to some

employees' attitudes. "What happened with Covid, though, made me speechless."

Oceanside's cat shelter is run by the San Diego Humane Society, which oversees two shelters in Oceanside as well as shelters in Escondido and San Diego. KB says that the city of Oceanside should look at contracting with a different operator to look after its abandoned local animals. "The shelter is no longer spaying or neutering the cats we brought in. I used to bring in as many as I could trap. Then they said because of Covid-19, they weren't doing it anymore. I get the impression these people

are greedy. They have greedy vice presidents who are getting paid but ignoring the needs of animals that they are now turning away."

The San Diego Humane Society website shows that it employs seven vice presidents and 11 "directors" who oversee specific departments. Their fifth annual Day of Giving fundraiser, held last month, raised \$606,624. They put

out their own magazine and oversee such projects as the Animal Adventure Camp, the Shelter Medicine Program, and a Pet Loss Support Group.

One recent communication from executive director Gary Weitzman had a cute photo of Peaches, a Vietnamese pot-bellied pig looking for a home. It was pictured above a dog in a rainbow tiara wishing members "Happy Pride." "In March, right after Covid hit, their website showed just a few cats for adoption in Oceanside, and they used to have 50," says KB. "I heard that when Covid hit and they stopped letting the public in. Where did all the cats go? Their staff says they are a no-kill shelter, but the truth is they only keep the animals that they think are immediately adoptable."

Jenny Major runs Sunrise Rescue, which is based in Oceanside but helps animals from throughout Southern California and Baja. She says that until her non-profit status is approved, she is operating as an independent rescuer. "I get contacted ten times a day from their cats, "because they think they will give them Covid." On the other hand, "People who are getting depressed find that having kittens helps them get out of their depression."

Major says she relies on low-cost clinics that charge only \$55 for a neuter and \$70 for a spay operation. "Other vets on the open market may charge up to \$250 for a neuter or \$600 for a spay. Some vets are taking advantage of us because they know that without the shelters, we are desperate." She explains that many rescuers facing high vet bills are finding that it pays to transport sickly cats south of the border. "I have a transporter who will take a cat to Tijuana for x-rays and then she brings it back to me. There is one cat with a possible brain tumor that was looking at a \$6000 head CT [scan] up here, but it was only \$600 down there. One transporter brought me six kittens from Mexico that were buried alive in a bag under a bunch of branches. They were discovered by a dog who sniffed them out. I had one pregnant cat from Tijuana named Bazmorda who was pregnant, had a bad eye, and was so constipated they thought she would die. That cost me \$600. But she's a happy cat who wants to live so here she is."

people about cats needing help," she says, adding that there is a vast Facebook network of animal rescuers. "I will take a lot of the tough cases. I paid for a \$4000 veterinary bill for a mother cat that had pneumonia myself. I still owe \$2000 on it. When Covid hit in March, a lot of the shelters just stopped taking animals and they stopped doing spays and neuters. A lot of that has to do with the sterile surgical gloves and the peroxide-based sanitizers

being diverted away from the animals and towards human hospitals. All this happened just at the same time the kitten season hit. People would leave kittens outside a shelter under a bush, and the shelters would tell the rescuers, 'You better come get these kittens or they will be put to sleep.' The shelters get help from the government but the rescuers rely only on donations." What's worse, Major says, is that some people are now dumping

Longtime volunteer Susan Kerner maintains that overall, animal rescue in Oceanside was greatly improved when it was taken over by the San Diego Humane Society in 2010. Before that it was run by the non-profit, independent North County Humane Society. In 2006 the executive director of the North County Humane Society resigned following a Drug Enforcement probe into missing Vicodin tablets. Former director Stacy Steel pleaded guilty to using the ID numbers of three veterinarians who had worked for the Oceanside shelter to acquire the drugs for herself. After she left, the shelter was plagued by massive staff overturn: over a four year period departure, the Society was led by four different executive directors, and seven key personnel left or were fired. Kerner says she doesn't think there is another operation that could even realistically bid to take over Oceanside's animal care contract.

Nina Thompson, acting marketing director for the San Diego Humane Society, says spay/ neuter surgeries has been resumed for the animals that they are sheltering. "No animals have been euthanized at San Diego Humane Society due to Covid-19. In fact [SDHS] has not euthanized a healthy or treatable shelter animal since 2002." Thompson does say that the shelters are now open through appointment only. "There are currently 19 cats available at our Oceanside campus. The COVID-19 pandemic has drastically reduced the number *continued on page 6*

"Kangaroo court" helps bounce **CSU trustee** Just weeks after San Diego State University

emerged victorious in its \$82 million bid to buy the city-owned land formerly known as Qualcomm Stadium, a closed-door power

struggle has caused the resignation of San Diego's newest appointee to the California State University's board of trustees. Jeffrey Krinsk, co-founder and managing partner of San Diegobased class action law firm Finkelstein & Krinsk, resigned on Friday, July 17, after what some insiders say was a behindthe-scenes facedown with past board chairman Adam Day involving university transparency.

The agenda for the trustees' July 21 meeting shows that dis-

cussion of a "Violation of Trustees' Code of Conduct and Resolution of Censure," was to be introduced by current chair Lillian Kimbell. "Chair Kimbell will present information regarding misconduct by a member of the Board of Trustees which Chair Kimbell has determined to be a breach of the Trustees'

Code of Conduct and will recommend that the Board of Trustees vote to censure the Trustee."

The conduct code, per a Los Angeles Times account, "says, among other things, that a trustee should use designated institutional channels when conducting board business and refrain from actions that may prove embarrassing to the CSU."

"I resigned because of the

censure and the belief that it took place... without my knowledge or ability to respond," Krinsk told the Times. "It was a kangaroo court." Seventy-year-old Krinsk was appointed to the seat in August of last year by Gov. Gavin Newsom but was still awaiting confirmation by the state senate. The Times described a May committee meeting

during which Krinsk vigorously questioned the timing and adequacy of a previous meeting notice. After producing evidence of the date of the notice, the paper said Day told Krinsk, "I would appreciate in the future... to refrain from impugning the character of our hardworking staff." For his part,Krinsk told the Times that "the idea of

acting politely is secondary to my belief that accomplishment and meaningful consideration of alternatives is important to a university as important as the CSU."

CSU has a widely known predilection for guarding the secrecy of many of its records, ostensibly available to the public under the state's public records and public meeting acts. In one recent case. a February 2019 request for the retention agree-

ment and fee schedule between the university system and the law firm of Sheppard Mullin, hired to conduct closed-door negotiations with the city over the sale of the **Oualcomm Stadium site, was denied, "The** record which memorializes the retention agreement between the CSU and Sheppard

"Agreements entered between CSU and outside legal firms are protected by the attorney-client privilege and attorney work product doctrine and will not be disclosed. statements are also protected from disclosure under the attorney-client privilege and work product doctrine."

Ex-CSU board chairman Day is chief administrative officer of the Sycuan Band of the Kumeyaay Nation, the East County casino owner, and onetime chief of staff to Supervisor Dianne Jacob. He was a key continued on page 27

#### UNDER THE RADAR

Cisterra's cash A political action committee attached to the Downtown San Diego Partnership, a non-profit group ostensibly devoted to improving life and business in the center city, served as a conduit for lobbyists' money funneled into races for both Democratic and Republican county central committees. According to the PAC's July 20 disclosure for the period from February 16 through June 30, \$5000 was paid to city council Democrat Vivian Moreno's central committee reelection bid; \$2000 went to a

group calling itself Republicans Keeping San Diego Great, benefiting the GOP central committee election bids of Kevin Faulconer mayoral staffers Aimee Faucett, Francis Barraza, and Elizabeth Spillane, chief of staff for termed-out city councilman Mark Kersey. He gave up the GOP last year to become an independent, after abandoning a troubled 2018 Republican state senatorial primary bid. Moreno and the three Republicans pre-

vailed in their respective races, per election results posted online by Ballotpedia.org. Moreno has made no secret of her desire to block unwanted Democratic endorsements by the central committee, which could threaten her future political aspirations.

Downtown San Diego's financial backing of the Faucett, Barraza, Spillane, and Moreno efforts has come from a bevy of special interests, including the influential lobbying firm of Sheppard Mullin, which kicked in \$3333 on March 2, and the same from Cisterra 7th and Market, LLC. Cisterra is the would-be developer of a controversial Ritz Carlton Hotel, along with offices and housing two blocks east of the Gaslamp Quarter.

According to a July 8 disclosure filing, Sheppard Mullin has been retained by Cisterra to lobby for approval of "land use entitlements, environmental analysis, including Site Development Permit, Development and Disposition Agreement and related approvals for development of a mixed-use project including residential, hotel, commercial and cultural uses at 7th & Market in the Centre City area of downtown San Diego."

#### Sempra's limited charity San

Diego-based Sempra Energy grabbed a few headlines back in March of this year when the giant power company announced its foundation would be handing out "\$1 million to help small to medium-sized nonprofits in California as they continue to serve critical needs related to the ongoing coronavirus situation." Added the company's news release: "The grants for California nonprofits will be part of a larger \$1.75 million Nonprofit Hardship Fund from the Sempra Energy Foundation that will be made available to charities in the areas of the United States where Sempra Energy and its family of companies operate, including California, Texas and Louisiana."

But the fund was quickly tapped out, with no word yet on when the company will replenish it. "On April 3, the online application was shut down due to a significant volume of requests," per Sempra's website. "We have now distributed the full \$1.75 million across all three states to help

> meet basic needs for vulnerable populations and will be assessing unmet needs and factoring these considerations into our future planning."

> Federal disclosure reports show that during 2018, the most recent period for which filings are available, Sempra's foundation handed out a total of \$1.832 million in "contributions, gifts, and grants paid," but received a total of just \$706 in contributions. Interest on the cash bal-

ance was \$143, 953. The shortfall reduced the book value of the charity's assets from \$10.121 million at the beginning of the year to \$8.440 million by December 2018. Major donations included \$50,000 each to Save the Children and International Medical Corps; \$10,000 went to the San Diego Lesbian Gay Bisexual and Transgender Community Center; and \$75,000 to the American Red Cross in Washington, D.C.

#### **Trump's local consultants**

Among former San Diegans working for President Donald Trump, the biggest name is arguably Peter Navarro, one-time anti-growth Democrat and mayoral candidate who narrowly lost

to Republican Susan Golding back in 1992. But some other locals are also playing prominent roles in Trump's reelection bid. Hannah Castillo, director of coalitions for the Trump campaign, is a GOP Hispanic outreach specialist formerly from Phoenix. In San Diego, she managed the unsuccessful 2016 city council campaign of Ray Ellis and was leadership development manager for the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce. Castillo worked

as marketing director for San Diego's Deverett Media Group, run by self-styled family TV movie-maker Jeff Deverett, according to the website Democracyinaction.us. Among current projects under development, according to the company website is Sweet 15, whose principal Sophie "is turning 15 and her parents are so excited to be planning the big Quinceañera celebration. #### **Cinema by the sea** Will pandemic produce drive-in revival?

On July 17, at about sunset, some *Rosaritenses* flocked to the beach adjacent to Abelardo L. Rodríguez Park, a block west of Federal Highway 1. The occupants of the predominantly packed vehicles were greeted by a Tijuana Zonkey-looking mascot and Rosarito mayor Araceli Brown and her entourage. "We are going to watch [*Maleficent*] at 9 pm tonight," Brown had said on a Facebook Live video.

"We still have time — come by with the whole family." DIF, a social service agency of the Mexican government, recently transformed the beachfront property into Auto Cinema, a drive-in movie theatre similar to our South Bay and Santee drive-ins. People can watch the movie through the windshield of their cars; sometimes, truck and station wagon drivers park backward, so the occupants can lie down and watch the movie from the back

of their vehicles.

Friday, July 17 was the beachfront theatre's grand opening; the entrance fee was 200 pesos (\$8.86 USD) per vehicle, and the following day, they showed *Guardians of the Galaxy* and *Relentless*. The news and preview posts were shared over 300 times on Facebook. "OMG, how cool," Bianca commented. "But after a while, I want to walk to the ocean."

"But what about the waves?" Juan questioned. "Won't the noise affect the movie experience?"

Aside from Juan, nobody else commented about the three-foot waves crashing close by and interrupting Angelina Jolie's translated audio.

"[There are] no speakers," posted Lynn, a Grossmont College alumna. "It's a low-frequency FM broadcast that we can tune into from our home." Her accompanying Facebook photo was taken from an elevated vantage point, and

showed two giant movie screens with 20-plus vehicles in the frame. According to Mexican news reports, the drive-in accommodated 100 cars or trucks and has a third movie screen.

Mario, a local movie buff, saw the online previews. "Drive-ins will make a comeback, watch," he opined. "Walk-in theaters aren't open yet, and we are tired of streaming during this pandemic. I like to see big action on a big screen, and because I have a thumping

sound system in my car, it's as if you're part of the movie. If lockdowns continue, and social distancing becomes the norm, drive-ins are the wave of the future."

Marco, a computer tech from Rosarito, reminisced, "Drive-in movie theaters back then taught me so much. Not a whole lot from

what was happening on the screen, but what was happening while walking [past] rows of rocking cars on my way to the kiosk to buy popcorn. I had to dodge the cables from the poles to the speaker hanging on the partly open windows; there was no Bluetooth back then. [It was] hard to see through some of the steamed-up windows, though. Yup, quite an education for a kid way back when. The '60s were a blast. I say bring it all back."

On July 11, Tijuana's Bigmoon Auto Cinema showed the circa-1986 Queen: Live At Wembley Stadium concert video. The circa-2017 drive-in theatre can accommodate 60 vehicles and is about nine miles southeast of the San Ysidro/Tijuana border. As Freddie Mercury was singing on the 100-foot movie screen — and heard via the venue's loudspeakers - gyrating spotlights on each side of the screen beamed colored lights through the smoke emitting from the fog machines. "Do you guys want to see Michael Jackson, Metallica, Led Zeppelin, in open air like we are now?" asked a Bigmoon Auto Cinema rep on the company's Facebook Live feed. "Bro, that's what's up," responded Mario. Although city planners took the plan to a number of advocacy groups, they brought the plan to the community planners committee, which is made up of people from four dozen neighborhood planning groups, only after the comment period ended on June 11. And it still has not been presented to individual neighborhoods, from what planning department head Mike Hansen told the city's official planning commission. Nor was it presented by city planners or the mayor to city-created recreation councils that oversee hyperlocal park use. Instead, neighborhood planning group leaders heard about it in June through the parent committee, and carried the information back to the planning groups. It's not clear if any recreation councils have discussed it. (Most parks and rec centers have been closed or limited since the pandemic lockdowns began.) When they reviewed the parks point plan,





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## **U**NREAL **E**STATE

La Jolla Farms is easily one of San Diego's most exclusive neighborhoods. Bordered by the Salk Institute to the north, Scripps Institution of Oceanography to the south, and the UC San Diego campus to the east, the Farms consists of just 96 private parcels along the bluffs towering 300 feet above Black's Beach.

Unlike the village of La Jolla, where luxurious homes jockey for space and views on lots often no bigger than those found in a typical suburban tract,

estates in the Farms enjoy an acre or more of private land. That's plenty of room to house the elaborate pools, private tennis facilities, and the manicured lawns usually reserved for inland upscale hotspots such as Rancho Santa Fe. All this makes the Farms "one of the most affluent and secluded communities in San Diego." The area, and the beach below, acquired their respective names from the Black family, which moved to La Jolla around the time horse racing began in earnest in Del Mar. The land that comprises the Farms was originally a thoroughbred farm where the Blacks raised and trained their race horses.

Listed for the first time in over 25 years, the gated private estate at 9740 Black Gold Road occupies 1.29 acres of fully landscaped grounds. Promotional materials featured on *realtor.com* call the freshly updated property an "entertainer's delight."

The home is described as an "elegant recently remodeled luxury mansion with unobstructed ocean views from the master bedroom." The "highly secure estate offers hardwood floors, multiple view decks including a rooftop deck framed by colorful gardens, lush landscaping, a beautiful fruit orchard, and privacy." The nine-bedroom, eight-bath residence includes nearly 8800 square feet of living area, offering "endless entertaining possibilities" thanks to its "chef's kitchen and butler kitchen, wine room, cozy theater room, and game room." There's also a private "gym, with room for indoor spa rooms" and a guest suite that occupies its own wing of the house.

The master bedroom alone occupies nearly 500 square feet of living space, not including the bathroom suite outfitted with a marble-lined tub and shower. Other features include five fireplaces, zoned air conditioning, a backup generator to ensure the home is never without power, and garage parking for four cars with a large circular driveway to park another dozen behind the compound's security gate.

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## To play with DEPTUS al day

In the pandemic, reptile sales are spiking, not decreasing.

o hold an anaconda, it's best to spread your hands out like spatulas and let the snake lie there, feeling supported. If the serpent doesn't feel buoyed in your hands, it will squirm and droop like it's upside down, which, from its spatial orientation, it is. The snake has a belly-the lighter colored half underneath—and the belly wants to be down, if not on the ground, then grounded. Otherwise, it curls and twists, not because it has it in for you, but because the creature is trying to get away, that is, out of midair and back to the security of its burrow or enclosure. Once you brace the writhing beast from below, snake and handler calm down-find, as it were, common ground.

I'm fascinated by this snakehuman interaction. It's early 2020, the coronavirus has been uncaged in Wuhan and headed for Europe, and I'm agog at the many ways we approach these coiling marvels. By "we," I mean my fellow southern Californians, those, like me, whose alarmmeters ping at the sight of anything thrashing about and those whose delight in serpents is irrepressible — both sorts mingling in a sky-high ceilinged arena for the Reptilian Nation Expo at the Del Mar Fairgrounds.

It may be a generational thing—a millennial thing that teens, tweeners, and kids pack the hall; apparently, they love shopping, buying, owning, housing, raising, and holding up (from below) the very snakes and other reptiles/amphibians at which their pulled-along grandparents recoil.

A sixteen-year-old, his forehead tangled with a waggish mop of black hair, asks a snake dealer if he might examine a small pattern-honed ball python. (Much more on these captive breeds in a minute.) Clearly a devotee, he cradles the snake in his open

hands and brings it close to his chest, then to his face, his eyes wide, smiling possessively. He slows his hand motions to the pace of the curious, nearsighted snake. It's not quite two feet long, very delicate, the color of scrambled eggs with inky marks like cracked asphalt after an earthquake. An animated abstract painting.

Then, with choirboy affection, he rubs a finger under the snake's chin, and the python, its head/neck still in the S-curve (as if to strike), seems to bliss out, kittenish, at the tender touch. The teenager says to his group of friends watching him, "When I have money and I don't live in a mobile home anymore, I'm going to buy one of these guys."

A young girl, daughter of a father who tells me they "already have eleven ball pythons at home, in buckets," shows off her latest purchase — a coiled constrictor resting on a damp paper towel inside an eight-inch

wide plastic container. Its mottled markings alternate a vanilla white and a banana cream - sort of like a yoghurt swirl. The dad says, "OK, honey, now we've got a dozen," and the daughter looks sagely pleased, as if she's been given a diary in which to record her secret thoughts.

(Fun facts: In the last 25 years, captive breeders have engineered 5000 patterns and colors for the ball python species. The snake is motion-named because that's its defense: tucking its wedge head in, the python spirals its body tight when it's stressed or afraid, which, owing to all the Expo fuss, must be most of the time.)

I pass hundreds of deli cups of ball pythons as well as hundreds of clear plastic boxes with outré species like the New Guinea Red-Eyed Croc Skink, six inches long with a spikestippled back; and the male Desert Iguana, of local renown, the lizard that does female-inviting pushups. (In the legitimate commercial snake trade, no venomous snakes are sold.) Serpents slumbering in their containers seem okeydokey under heat lamps, flicking their tongues at their lids: Where am I? Orlando, Memphis, Anaheim?

It's easy to anthropomorphize snakes, especially when such human devotion suggests cuddliness, adoption, and bonding. In our new stayat-home era, these exotics have seized the acquisitive imagination of Americans, our new national pets. As the trend preys on Mom and Dad — owning a reptile is a parental signal of a kid's maturity — living room terraria and their horde may surpass zoos in the preservation and cultivation of this class of animals, some 12,000 species. Even so, collectible creepers such as the Sulcata Tortoise (lives to 100) and the Hermit Crab (lives to 10) seem as indifferent to us as anything else we try and domesticate.

#### From Costa Rica to a deli cup

I'm escorted through this faunal miscellany of Assassin Bugs, Tanzanian Tailless Scorpions, and Baby Nile Monitors by Loren Leigh, owner of LLL Reptiles (flagship store in Escondido) and a major exhibitor at the Reptile Expo. Three of Leigh's seven regional stores, where he sells all kinds of scaly critters, are in Southern California. In the pre-viral years, he displayed his animals and product lines at 35 reptile expos across the country. "Sixty-five percent of people in the U.S. own a dog," he says. "Nine percent own reptiles." It's not huge —not yet — but it's more th an doubled in the last decade.

Leigh, his talk spiced with genial humor, is quick to point out that "the trade" includes snakes, lizards (fan favorite: the bearded dragon), salamanders, frogs, toads, turtles, tortoises, and arachnids (spider idol: tarantulas). Essentially, planetary ground dwellers. The study of these animals is herpetology, from the Greek herpo, to creep or crawl. Which, metaphorically speaking, suggests surprise, stealth, and, with the addition of witches, conjuration and the dark arts: eye of newt, toe of frog, adder's fork, lizard's leg.

The online market, he says, is unquenchable. "Reptiles are one of the few animals we can ship. You can't just go to FedEx and package a dog. But these reptiles can be transported around in containers. With a little food and water, they're fine." (Reptile prices range from \$50 to \$4500; the sky-high tags

attach to the rarest and the prettiest.)

The Del Mar Expo is a midsize retail fair on the exhibition highway. Events nationwide and worldwide number in the thousands. In Southern California, the Reptile Nation Expo arrives spring and fall in Del Mar, as well as in Ontario, Long Beach, and San Bernardino. (The largest trade event is in Chicago, a Macedonian army of 500 vendors, replete with many hundreds of species.) Leigh says of breeders, "We used to

be backroom hobbyists, now we're businesses." His tabled array carries all the accoutrements for both intimate and massive terraria, with such products as fake hollowed-out logs to burrow in, lots of moss, and the ubiquitous touch of the macabre, a (plastic) human skull.

Temecula breeder Michael Roscoe, new to the pet trade, is already specializing in "high-end ball pythons and boas and lizards." Another hobbyist turned entrepreneur, he travels overseas a lot, often to Germany. To transport his product, he must "individually pack them with heat, cold, whatever the journey demands. They need insulated boxes in line with the airlines, which require permits and health certificates and veterinary inspections, as do U.S. Fish and Wildlife, and the U.S.D.A." He laughs heartily at the onerous regulations. Profits, however, are not his prime motivator. "I get to play with reptiles all day."

Leigh, 42, has fulfilled his childhood passion

for reptiles. He wants to extend the love to closeknit families. "Look around," he says. "Young families, kids, teenagers. They used to be 'backroom, in-the-garage, weird-dad' animals. Now they're in the living room, Mom's into it, it's a teaching tool. It's replaced the hamster."

The young treasure "the oddity of it all," he says, the tinkerer's shop of gemlike shapes, textures, colors. The chameleon swivels its eyes to see in front of and behind itself, independently, too, a companionable sleuth or sidekick for a child. (Capitalizing on chameleon cuteness is Disney's Pascal in *Tangled*.)

One industry motivator is that millennials worry far less about the crawling horde than their parents and grandparents. In addition, unlike the extroverted dog or horse, reptiles induce a sciencefiction-like awe, "beings from another world." Leigh says. And while ancient myths of reptiles stalking helpless humans abound (in the Garden of Eden, the Serpent is Satan transmogrified), those myths dissolve once the animals are handled and studied.

The biggest motivator in reptile growth, according to Leigh, is that families treat the acquired animal like a companion. "For us, the fish tank of 50 years ago is now the snake tank." Recently, a buyer thanked him for selling him "Lorenzo." "Who is 'Lorenzo'?" Leigh asked. It's a tortoise, with a 50-year lifespan, who teaches his kids responsibility: he must be fed, kept clean, engaged, and turtle-sat during familv vacations.

"Most snakes do not get big," Leigh says. "Most snakes are not harmful; most snakes are wary of us, and they're defensive. Look around. People are holding monitor lizards without an ounce of dread." He says wary "parents and their 1975-fear-of-everythingreptile" label any monitor "a Komodo dragon," ready to rip your face off. Kids think "just the opposite — my reptilian friend."

#### Reptile study and preservation

Strolling through the San Diego Natural History Museum's Living Lab exhibition (caged live animals) with longtime curator of herpetology Brad Hollingsworth, I learn that after years spent watching visitors, he calls crawly creatures the "unlovables. A herpetologist deals with people's negative perceptions of a venomous snake, a scaly lizard, a slimy frog. 'Oh, they're so prehistoric'" — like that's a bad thing.

The tag "unlovable" suggests conflict between those who treasure these animals and those who loathe them. To be clear, the Natural History Museum does no breeding; its reptilian/ amphibian focus is local habitats. Hollingsworth says, "We hunt, we trap, we count reptiles" in the Southern California and northern Baja wild. The museum exhibits very few live species.

When it comes to snakes, the serpents with

the greatest and grimmest notoriety are rattlesnakes. The public's response to these triangle-headed beasts is fear of getting bit. But that fear regularly accompanies disrespect and ignorance, Hollingsworth says, even the desire to "chop off its head! How about just keeping our distance when we encounter a rattler?" he asks. "As midlevel predators, they are crucial to regional ecosystems." They are food for covotes and they control rodents. They have their place, though we are hesitant to let them have it.

Reptile decline is real. Many species have been overrun by human rapacity, while few have thrived. Take a couple of frog species. Who knew how fierce their competition has been? A century ago, the American bullfrog overtook local ponds. How? Served for dinner in "frog-leg restaurants," a few hopped out of the pot, down the alley, and into local ponds and estuaries. They flourished because they are insatiable, "ferocious predators," Hollingsworth says. "Herps eating herps." Even today, these invaders are still "displacing native frogs, turtles,

and garter snakes."

One of the more defenseless of its genus — rana — has been the native California Red-Legged frog. This frog has "massively declined" due to the American bullfrog's ravaging. Hollingsworth and his colleague's prime mission, mostly in northern Baja, is to protect the Red-Legged from invasive plants and predators, and, if possible, restore their natural habitats, giving the amphibian a chance at a comeback. So far, it's a mild success, as their numbers, according to the latest count at the Nat website, hover around 200.

#### The wild bunch and the pet trade

Hollingsworth helps me nail down two approaches to herpetology. One is the reptile in the wild (its flora habitat), which the museum studies and catalogs, and the other is the pet trade in reptiles (its breeding facility and living-room habitats), which has become a thousand times more plentiful. Regarding the former, Hollingsworth describes the newest research tool: digital photography. Such documentation - leaving the critters *in situ* — is a





hands-off way to "collect" reptiles in the wild. Photographers post their shutter-finds and the breadth of their discoveries on the website I-Naturalist.

Hollingsworth is still processing how to think about the role of herp collectors in a world losing so many amphibian and reptile native spaces. (In the United States, 80 percent of the wetlands that once existed no longer do.) He says, "All pet collecting has its purpose and place in educating people and letting them fall in love with a reptile's intimate nature - especially when you're keeping one at home. For me, [those reptiles are] far removed from natural habitats and the wild."

What's more, the place of reptiles in our world is not just a species concern but an environmental one. He partitions the divide like so: human-made environments for reptiles, manufactured and decentralized and temperaturecontrolled; and natural

There's a split — the tension weighing on animals more than on us — between public and private, between the wild and the zoo, between a species' right to self-determination and a human right to species-ownership. (Rights we extend to ourselves can be, but seldom are, extended to animals.)

As I press Hollingsworth about the pet trade, he is hesitant to "say anything ill about people." He's curious about the amateur breeders and their intentions. To what degree "does the selling of [captive] animals help wild animals?" He's not sure what the answer is. But there's continued on page 39

Amid the ever-changing rules about how breweries may do business, at least one positive development remains constant: the ability of breweries to deliver beer directly to consumers' doorsteps. This regulatory reliaf has offered an opportunity to retain loyal customers, and to sell more beer — that is, for beer and booze companies with the resources to offer home delivery.

For a collection of small breweries in North County, a new service emerged in April that offers same-day delivery to residents who live north of the 56 freeway, and as far north as Fallbrook. **BrewCatalog.com**

The small startup was built on the hustle of young entrepreneur Jason McBride. The recent Cal State San Marcos graduate originally teamed up with partners to develop an online ordering platform for self-distributing breweries: something beer buyers could use to quickly view and order kegs. But when the pandemic hit, McBride explains, "The landscape of wholesale changed."

While the closing of bars and restaurants all but tanked the need for wholesale ordering, when the new rules allowed delivery, he says, "We took that opportunity to pivot to direct to consumer."

He reconfigured the web site for retail customers, and now picks up beers from each brewery for daily deliveries. Delivery is free over \$100, and ranges from \$1-7 depending on zip code otherwise. Breweries pay a commission on each order, which proves less than the cost of delivering their own beers.

"We were going to do the delivery thing," says Culver Beer cofounder Ben Fairweather, "but

they tend to re-order beers from their favorite breweries, but also, "They're trying breweries they weren't trying before, in addition to the ones they already like."

Four months since launching, McBride still handles the deliveries himself, as he can't be sure whether regulations will continue long enough to invest in an additional vehicle or driver. However, he remains optimistic that California will see the merit in making this regulatory relief permanent. "I don't consider them deregulations," he says. "I consider them new regulations." His delivery customers

seem to feel the same way.

McBride continually asks them for feedback, and tends to hear the same thing: "Even before the pandemic, they wanted their beer delivered."

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## **Cook the books**

It's an artistic mix of egg, pepper, red onion, queso fresco, radish slices, and avo.

uess what? Bright orange umbrellas on Orange Avenue. They light up the blue sky near Tenth in Coronado.

The gods must've been speaking to me this morning. It so happens the scarf I wrapped around my face is bright orange. Is this Destiny or what?!

Whatever, there is a kind of rebirth going on hereabouts. A favorite haunt had been the Cafe

Madrid, right outside the original Bay Books. You could grab your book, or magazine or iPad, and then go sit down right in front of the bookstore, and start reading and sipping in the aura of that shopload of knowledge.

Of course, the Cafe Madrid was only a coffee cart, started by the much-loved Luis Madrid, but it had a perfect *feng shui* about it. Nobody told you to "Please wait to be seated," and - way ahead of its time — it was all outside. So, Covid-ready.

And usually, it would be full of local characters and tourists, arguing about, well, let's not even go there. But not bitter and twisted. Relationships mattered more. And all you had to buy was a \$1.50 cup of joe.

Then comes the new landlord, triples rents, and closes down all who can't afford to play ball. Then, Covid. But finally, good news: Bay Books has reopened, a few doors north. And, included, the Bay Books Cafe, Covid-ready, all outside. And this time, guess what? They're offering actual food!

Breakfast, anyway. And reasonably priced too, looks like.

You can spot the cook among the books, Jose Wong, swirling eggs, shaking pepper on top, popping a pan into an oven.

The smells are enough to stop me in my tracks. I know their joe is good. I've paused for a cuppa here before. The two baristas, Paulina and Jorge, pour a flavorsome blend. It's from Cafe Virtuoso out of Barrio Logan. Organic. Roasted right.

And today, I'm spotting an extra sandwich board on the sidewalk, advertising hot breakfasts. They have the normal baked goods display, but

options. Croissant egg sandwich, and avocado toast. Hmm. I still ain't holding

out much hope for anything you could actually call a full-on brekky. Except that the garlicky, bacony aromas filtering through my orange scarf are telling me to hang in there.

So why not? But which one? The toast with stuff piled on top, or the croissant with everything stuffed inside. Toast's \$7.95. Croissant's \$8.25. Good prices. Honestly, it's hard to find anything cooked for under 15 bucks on the island. Usually, as they say in Hawaii, it's Island Prices. So just on principle, I go for one of each. Plus lay down about three bucks for the coffee. I secure a table spot just as Paulina calls out

now they have added two more serious breakfast

"Avocado toast!" She slides over a white box. We're not talking silver service. Not even paper plates. But I open the box, and have to say, it does look nice in there. It's an artistic mix of egg, pepper, red onion, queso fresco, radish slices, and avo. Lots of avo. Sliced, not squished into a paste people usually wipe on in an avocado toast situation. And on top, purple and white edible orchid petals. It's a piece of art.

I hate to bust it up, but I take one bite anyway, right at the counter. Oh yes. So-o savory.

"It's toast from a batard loaf," says Jose. He tells me the *batard* is called that because its football shape was between the classic long baguette and the round boule type. (Think Mexican "bolillo," but bigger.) The "bastard" shape was called that because it was neither long nor round. It was the last shape to arrive on the French scene, in the 1800s. Nouvelle kid on the bloque!

Whatever, it's a delicious, tangy toasty bread. "I put French butter, olive oil, and then crumble queso fresco on top," Jose says. "And pepper is important for the taste."

He's right about that. It's essential for the egg and avo combo. Really, it's a beautiful lush mix that hits just the right notes with the coffee. And

Jose and Paulina: new ideas for

munching it out here on the fresh morning sidewalk? Can't beat it. I even enjoy the orchid petals, though they are more for looks than flavor.

Turns out Jose is a highly-qualified chef. His family owns an Asian restaurant in Merida, in the Yucatán, not far from Cancun. The Xing Yun. "It means 'Good Luck," he says. "I'm 24 now, been cooking since I was 14. I have cooked in 29 restaurants." One was Micaela Mar y Lena, one of the most famous in Merida. "It was 18 hours a day, seven days a week, for three months. No days off, \$200 a week. But I learned everything there." He also graduated from a prestigious

culinary school, has worked with three Michelinstarred chefs, and later this year will be heading to a job in Japan. "I want to learn as much as I can," he says. In the meantime, he has plans for Bay Books Cafe. "The owners are applying for a wine and beer license," he says. "We're talking about offering sunset oysters and other delicacies in a happy hour. It feels right for a bookshop cafe."

Boy, what a great idea. Specially with the sun setting right across Orange.

Meantime, Paulina calls out "Croissant egg sandwich!"

Oh man. That's me. And already I'm pretty full

> with the avo batard toast. Still, this loaded crescent turns out to be lighter than air, crispy flaky, eggy (there's two over-easy eggs in there), and whacked into a tangy sharpness by a thick wad of bacon. Fresh coffee helps too.

It hits me: here, outside a book store, right in the middle of the sidewalk, we are becoming seriously gastronomic.

I sit back, get ready to liberate this table. The rising sun's rays become orange through the umbrellas. The orchid petals look luminous.

But I'm already thinking oysters. Can't wait for the oysters.



Mona Lisa; 2061 India Street, Little Italy. A shudder passed through San Diego's sandwich-loving

community this week when news spread of a suspected arson attempt at San Diego's old school Italian

deli, Mona Lisa Italian Foods. In as perilous a year as 2020, the idea a beloved institution would go up in flames seemed entirely too plausible.

And what happened did very much resemble 2020, in the sense it was an actual dumpster fire. Fortunately, our fire department was right on top of the small blaze, and though it scarred the side of the going-on-fifty-year business, the staff inside the deli tell me it wasn't enough to disrupt business.

Indeed, when I stopped by the day after the fire to pick up a few sub sandwiches, a steady flow of customers still trickled in, grabbed a ticket, and waited for their number to be called. Granted, we

were all wearing

masks, and working to dodge each other in the narrow aisles of the deli shop, which sells a hearty selection of Italian cured meats, cheeses, liqueurs, and pantry items.

The other side of the building is normally a sitdown restaurant, which has been closed to diners during the pandemic re-closing. The good news on that front is that Mona Lisa's pizzas, pastas, and

hot sandwiches are still available to go during regular business hours, and that the restaurant is putting the indefinite closure to good use by remodeling

However, despite fire and virus, the deli side operates about the same as it ever was, and it was always a great place to grab to-go sandwiches, built

Per usual, one of the sandwiches in my order was the deluxe, a classic Italian sub of mortadella, dry salami, ham, and provolone. The triple threat deli sandwich never fails to satisfy, but cured meats are a big deal at Mona Lisa, so I usually like to try a second sandwich featuring one, whether its Genoa salami, imported prosciutto, or spicy sop-

I passed the scorched outside wall on my way out of the deli and set off in search of some self-styled al fresco dining. In all my years dining out in

San Diego, I don't think I've ever sought out so many picnic spots. Though many of our neighborhood restaurants are having a go at crafting new outdoor

spaces to enjoy, those that only do to go orders can benefit from San Diego's multitude of outdoor spaces. While I've been practicing isolation, I have been able to find unbusy parks, or sections of beach, and have been using my take-out orders as an excuse to enjoy a bit of outside time. Now I wonder why I ever thought to eat Mona Lisa subs indoors in the first place. by Ian Anderson

#### How the internet saved **Hogetsu Bakerv**

Hogetsu Bakery; 1210 Third Avenue, Chula Vista. For 37 years, Masa and Haru Takeda have made and served Japanese tea cakes in their tiny Chula Vista shop, Hogetsu Bakery. Primarily, they offer mochi, the chewy, glutinous rice cakes enjoyed with tea and on special occasions in the land of the rising sun.

When Hogetsu first opened, they worked seven days a week, kept busy by an aging contingency of war brides, the Japanese wives who came back in the arms of American soldiers following World War II. By the time that nostalgic generation began to pass on, younger members of Chula Vista's diverse community had discovered the sweet, gummy-like treats, keeping the Takedas in steady business over the years. Steady, that is, until the pandemic struck, and the small business took a big hit.

It was around Father's Dav that Chula Vista realtor Edna Mitchell shared a photo of Hogetsu mochi to the Facebook group Eating and Drinking in San Diego, along with a warning the shop "had a much bigger display/variety" prior to covid-19, and was "possibly closing down" due to a slowdown in business. Members of the sometimes quarrelsome, always hungry group were quick to decide

The pink and yellow striped, more chewy mochi

they would not let that happen, and stepped up en masse to save the day.

The jovial shop owners talk back and forth to tell me what happened next, the way close couples sometimes do.

"We had lines going all the way to the back, every single day," says Masa. "It never stopped!"

"Everything sold out," Haru interjects, "So we had to produce more."

"We worked 'til 2 or 3 in the morning," adds the husband.

"Chaos!" laughs the wife. "It was unexpected, it was very unexpected."

The Takedas don't use computers, so they didn't see the surge in customers coming, and while it's given their struggling business a boost, they find humor in the idea there may have been a bit of misunderstanding. They did move their entire selection of mochi - which includes strawberry, green tea, coconut, and other flavors — into a single glass counter. But they tell me the main reason they did so is that they're getting older, and no longer had the patience to walk ten feet back and forth between cases while customers picked over the flavors they wanted.

As for the talk of closing the shop? "We're getting to the age of retiring," says Haru.

They don't know exactly when they will end Hogetsu's run, but want to do so by choice, rather than when they're forced to by age or health. "There's a Japanese saying," Masa explains, "If you wait until you fall to buy a cane, you're too late."

A masked Masa Takeda, standing in his Japanese tea cake shop of 37 years

Masa Takeda has been making traditional mochi for 50 years. He spent three years learning to do so in his native Kyoto, Japan, and the skill earned him a visa to the U.S. by virtue of the cultural contribution he would bring. He first set up shop in Little Tokyo, Los Angeles, where he met his wife, a thirdgeneration Japanese-American. He tells me he decided to move to San Diego during a 1980s visit to San Clemente. To the north, he saw traffic and smog. To the south, he saw blue skies and open spaces. And so they settled in Chula Vista.

Miscommunication or otherwise, Hogetsu continues to

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enjoy a resurgence thanks to the patronage of socially networked foodies, and the Takedas express extreme gratitude. What's certain is, for whatever reason, San Diegans may not have much longer to appreciate and enjoy the sweet and authentic Japanese treats Hogetsu Bakery provides, such as the *chofu*, a piece of *mochi* wrapped in a crepe, impressed with a small flower graphic.

In other words, we should keep the long lines coming. Just don't be surprised if the Takedas encourage you to visit one of the other small businesses next door, whether the Panda Imperial Chinese restaurant, or Los Primos Birria. When Hogetsu

does close, they would like to see other local businesses survive.

"The small stores, we are 90 percent of businesses in the United States," says Masa, "Those are the ones getting hurt [by the pandemic.] I want to help the local, small stores." by Ian Anderson

#### Kanye for president

On the 4th of July, Kanye West tweeted: "We must now realize the promise of America by trusting God, unifying our vision and building our future. I am running for president of the United States! !#2020VISION."

I took to my social media to see if the 43-year-old rapper turned entrepreneur would have San Diego voters lining up at the polls in support of "Ye". For West to be on our California presidential ballot as an independent, he has until August 7 to retrieve 196,964 signatures, which is 1 percent of our registered voters — according to Ballotpedia.org. Unlike West's massive

airtime and internet streams,



which copped him an unprecedented 21 Grammy awards - my reach out yielded the equivalent of radio silence. So I jumped online to peep the rapper's political movements, and listened to his CDs, including: Late Registration (2005), Graduation (2007), My Beautiful Dark Twisted Fantasy (2010), Yeezus (2013) — and his 2019 Jesus Is *King*: a Christian rap-infused, blue-colored CD packaged in a jewel case sans cover art, reminiscent of a test-press CD.

On July 5, SoCal rapper Ruslan KD tweeted a poll and captioned it "if the election was tonight, who would you vote for?"; of the 550 votes, with nine hours left, the "Famous" rapper was leading at 47.6 percent over Trump's 12.7 percent, Biden's 21.3 percent, with the remainder going to "others."

On July 16, the Yeezy sneaker creator qualified to appear on the November 3 Oklahoma presidential ballot, which was the first state where he met the requirements prior to the deadline. Kanye registered himself as a "BDY" (Birthday Party) independent candidate; and he paid the \$35,000 filing fee, according to Misha Mohr, an Oklahoma Board of Elections spokeswoman.


"Cha-ching," chimed my iPhone. Danielle, a local hip-hop head and 26-year-old college student, hit me via direct message. "I think Kanye probably wanted to test the waters," she typed. "Kanye has expressed that he is a newborn Christian and he sees Trump aligning himself with those values. I think he supports him because he agrees with what Trump stands for. On July 19, at West's first presidential rally in Charleston, South Carolina, West spoke on abortion, gun control, addiction, and abolitionist Harriet Tubman. But whereas his 2005 album Late Registration garnered him a Grammy award for Best Rap Album, his late registration and inability to collect 10,000 signatures in the state by the July 20 deadline, disqualified the rapper's

His business prowess allowed him to profit a unique brand, Yeezy, a mega brand he developed with Adidas. I think Kanye serves two purposes: he understands what the government structurally depends on, and that's money, and he connects with the voters through his branding and reach through his fashion products."

Outside, the grounds include a built in stainless steel barbecue station, fenced dog run, "massive entertaining deck," and a "resort style saltwater pool and spa."

Ownership in the Farms also comes with one of the most treasured prizes for San Diego surfers — a key to the gate blocking an access road to Black's Beach. Without it, beach access is limited to a pair of steep trails which are difficult to manage while carrying a surfboard. The precious few who posses one of the coveted keys are able to reduce their hiking time to the waterfront considerably.

According to public records, the Black Gold residence is owned by El J Associates, a holding company helmed by Sherry Kaen. Kaen purchased the property for a reported \$1,875,000 in 1995. Her husband Edward, likely without coincidence, is the cofounder of Blackgold Funds, a real estate investment firm.

After two-and-a-half decades off market, the 1990-built manse was listed for sale in late June with an asking price of \$10,900,000 that remains unchanged to date.

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#### **TOM BROSSEAU**

Due August 19, singer-songwriter Tom Brosseau's *The Prairie* will feature eight Brosseau originals and a cover of John Prine's "They Oughta Name A Drink After You." Guest players include Sheldon Gomberg, Robbie Robinson of Robinson Mastering, Mary Jones, and DLT. A single is streaming online for "My North Dakota Home," and a tour is in the works for September and October taking him through North Dakota, Washington, Oregon, and California. Brosseau has taken advantage of his quarantine time to release two albums already this year. *A Lifetime Ago* is a curated collection of the more obscure and unreleased songs spanning the years 2002 to 2019, with B-sides, studio outtakes, and live performances. *Live in York* is an acoustic concert album recorded in 2019 and featuring ten original songs: seven from various past releases, and three new tracks that were debuted in concert ("Maybe Tomorrow Night," "Town & Country," "I Found a Horseshoe"). Episode four of his monthly variety radio program *The Great American Folk Show* airs August 2 on Prairie Public, featuring bluegrass star Peter Rowan. Los Angeles-based street singer Sunny War, Toad the Wet Sprocket founding member Glen Phillips, and a visit with Mary Beth Orn and her daughter, Medora Burning Hills singer Bethany Andrist.



#### CULTS

"'Trials' focuses on the power that addictions and harmful ideologies have to transform," says Cults of their new single. "The chorus walks a tightrope between a metaphor for gaslighting and a despairing worry about the person you still hold out hope for." Taken from the duo's upcoming *Hosts* album due in September, a video for "Trials" was shot by Jeff Strikers. "Cults asked me back in April if I had any ideas for a music video we could make while quarantined across the country," says Striker. "Via Zoom, we shot Madeline [Follin]'s performance against a green tablecloth from a party store. I started experimenting with an old optical illusion called Pepper's Ghost, projecting Madeline's image onto a sheet of glass to create a ghostly, hologram effect. They use this technique on the Haunted Mansion at Disneyland. It was pretty magical, and the whole process was constant discovery and surprise. An ideal creative experience." The previous single from *Hosts*, "Spit You Out," celebrates ending toxic relationships. Co-produced by Cults and Shane Stoneback, mixed by John Congleton, and mastered by Heba Kadry, it's the band's first song entirely co-written, performed, sung, and co-produced by Madeline Follin.



#### **EDDIE VEDDER**

Former San Diegan Eddie Vedder once made a guest performance covering the Ramones' "I Believe in Miracles" with the Supersuckers, when they played the final, sold out show on their North American tour on June 19, 2014. That performance was just released as a single, thanks to the audio track being recently discovered. The set was shot with multiple cameras, but the multitrack audio files were found only recently, buried within the hard drive. "Somehow, Eddie had found out about my cancer diagnosis and put the word out that he'd like to come to the show and maybe do something with the band," recalls Supersuckers singer Eddie Spaghetti, who was about to undergo surgery at the time, "especially with the impending struggle I was about to undertake with the whole cancer fright. The song was extra poignant. After the show, Eddie talked to me for a long time and pointed me in a direction to get my shit cured. He was super helpful with getting me hooked up with a support team of doctors and hospitals that I would probably not have had access to without his assistance. He also wrote a big fat check to help get me through the hard times of not being able to work that was to come."



#### MATTE BLACK

The new dark electro-pop rock band Matte Black features Daniel Corrales, whose previous duo PRGRM essentially ended with the death of co-founding singer Tza, aka Tonya Pugh, in summer 2017. The band also includes Alex Gonzales, fresh off working on Julien-K's Harmonic Disrupter album, and Bidi Cobra. All three had previously played together in the New Division. "We started working on a lot of new material that needed to fall under a new entity that now is called Matte Black," says Cobra of the tracks that began to come together while the duo was touring with Julien-K's band. "Some of the songs were written for Harmonic Disrupter and didn't quite get picked up," says Gonzales, "but I still had a special place for them and decided to pursue them." The trio's debut album *I'm Waving, Not Drowning*, due later this year, includes a cover of Depeche Mode's "Stripped" and is so far preceded by a single for "Pure" that proudly displays its New Order influence, and is also reminiscent of pioneering local electronic duo Red Flag. Gonzales and Cobra recently performed a livestream set on Facebook from Gonzales' home studio.



#### **VOKAB KOMPANY**

Based in Pacific Beach, Vokab Kompany is a hip-hop, soul, and electro act that performs with a live backing band, usually including around five to seven musicians. Founder and co-producer Rob Hurt (aka Robbie Gallo) spent his teen years near Lake Tahoe, where he first teamed up with former high school English teacher Matt "Burkey" Burke, singer/MC of Native Root. The frequent San Diego Music Award winners have spun off countless solo projects and collaborations, and members sometimes moonlight by recording commercial jingles such as one of the "Movin' and Groovin'" TV and radio ads created and paid for by the Metro Transit System (MTS). A 2013 Kia Motors commercial featuring their song "Back to the Past," from a collaborative album with Crush Effect called *VKCE*, starred Blake Griffin as a time traveler who goes back to the past to visit his younger self. The first Vokab Kompany album since 2016, *Small Viktories*, recently dropped, opening with a track called "Like That" which features Denver-based Jpod.

A recent thought piece in the New York Times suggested that top tier orchestras could get rid of blind auditions in order to create more diversity in orchestras.

A blind audition means the musicians auditioning for an open spot in an orchestra perform behind a screen. The auditors do not even have the musician's name. This process ensures there is no discrimination based on race, gender, age, body type, weight, or visual playing style.

The musician is evaluated only on the quality of the music produced. A blind audition creates equality of opportunity. What the New York Times article is suggesting is called equality of outcome. With equality of outcome, the players that fulfill the desired outcome of the audition are given

According to the article, blind auditions were put into practice after a 1969 court case that was brought against The New York Philharmonic by two African-American musicians. Since then, the number of female orchestra players has risen dramatically. The number of African-American and Latino players has not.

Imagine, if you will, an orchestra holding an audition but only allowing African-American and Latino players to apply because the orchestra wants to add those demographics to the roster. That is what the New York Times is suggesting.

The article makes sure to emphasize that the percentage of African-American and Latino players is low. It makes no mention of the Asian players in orchestras.

The culture of classical music is not very appealing. There's not a lot of alcohol. no dancing, limited potential for sexual encounters, and everyone is sitting quietly. It's not a party, and people like to party. Getting rid of blind auditions will not change that.

For whatever reason, classical music journalists have the idea that if the demographics of orchestras reflect the demographics of the greater community it will improve community engagement.

I'm not sure what "community engagement" means. Hopefully, it is code for buying tickets and making donations, because that is what classical music organizations really need.

## Mooving picture

n ancient times, they might have called First Cow, an allegorical tale of two culturally discordant cowpokes who join forces to carve out a culinary slice of the American dream, "Figowitz and the Chinaman" and played it for laughs. Never one to shy away from solemnity, Kelly Reichardt is the last director you would expect to devote even a moment of screen time to playful self-reference, but,

billed as the "Woman With the Dog," Alia Shawkat and her

hound uncover a pair of skeletal remains while on a morning hike. Even with the ending behind me, the underlying rationale behind opening a western set in the early 1800s as a modern-day continuation of Wendy and Lucy escaped me.

Hired as cook for a company of Oregon fur trappers, Otis "Cookie" Figowitz fizzles when it comes to keeping the angry huntsmen fed. Frying fish is easy; it's catching one that presents a problem. His is a childly soul: in addition to aiding a baby lizard floundering as it tries to right itself, Cookie gives shelter to King-Lu (Orion Lee), a Chinese immigrant wanted for killing the man who murdered his best friend. Together with the help of a cow — the first one in the territory, imported from San Luis Obispo so that moneyed Brit Chief Factor (Toby Jones) might have milk with his morning tea - our duo of entrepreneurial neophytes are about to become the first Mrs. Fields outlet on the Oregon Trail.

The idea for baking was gently blended into the narrative. It's the little girl with the milk pail who first catches Cookie's eye. Tired of the flavorless "flour and water bread" that passed for scones, he steals onto Factor's property to siphon a cup of dairy. And with King-Lu's brains and Cookie's gastronomic brawn, the two are certain to have a hit on their hands.

There are no doubt those who will


Don't look for Shawkat to appear in a wraparound sement to close the picture; formula is not a term in Reichardt's lexicography. Without once calling him out by name, Wendy and Lucy captured the hopelessness and despair of George W. Bush's America better than any film of that period. This is nowhere near as ambitious as that, but the director arrives at a major personal awakening: a lead character who has finally come to trust a two-legged friend.  $\star \star \star \star$

The Cuban — Luis Garcia (Lou Gossett), a once influential and now unresponsive Cuban musician living out his days in a dementia-induced fog, is afforded one last whirl at life when his nursing home places him in the care of callow, well-intentioned pre-med student Mina (Ana Golja). She replenishes his dietary regimen with homecooked Cuban meals and restores music to his life — the needle hits the wax and the rainbow of cognizance that momentarily surges through Luis' every fiber is a special effect that defies CGI. Luis is far from the stock curmudgeon often tied to the genre: he was a mean drunk, and a negligent father who abandoned his family when his son was eight. But the supporting cast houses a veritable who's who of stock characters: the former love whom Luis now mistakes for his caretaker, Mina's Muslim mother (Shohreh Aghdashloo) who refuses to let her daughter date outside the faith, a Nurse Ratchet-lite supervisor (Lauren Holly) who looks down on her new hire's methodology, etc. Still, Gossett is nothing short of electrifying, and Golja is so convincingly naive that they alone kept it afloat for as long as possible before sentimentality and the candy colored flashbacks that line the film logjammed at the intersection of Artifice and Sap. 2019 -S.M. \*\*

that "the new plan would lead to worsening park shortages," even as the Complete Communities Plan adds 325,000 new people to the city. The Complete Communities plan –including city land on the northeast corner of Fairmont and El Cajon Boulevard would immediately get eight points, because it's near a major bus route. Add a sign for way-finding, tables and chairs, a place-making feature like banner art, a comfort station and arrange them in a way that an event could be held, and you've picked up as many as 23 points.

the parks point system — is being pushed hard just now. Launched just before the pandemic, the plan sailed through early review by city council members on Tuesday and is headed to the full city council this month.

The rush is raising objections. "We need more time to look at this," says Jim Baross, former chair and current member of the Normal Heights Community Planning Group and a retired Parks and Recreation Department analyst. "This is a citywide plan, but each neighborhood is very different. The design for the parks, how they're used, and the point system for each park needs to reflect the different area where parks are needed. Scripps Ranch has very different needs than Normal Heights, for example. Who assigns the point values is a really important question," Baross added. "Our (neighborhood) recreation councils have been devastated in the past year and haven't had a chance to look at this. Having a dedicated community group to inform those choices gets to a better result for the community."

Every neighborhood that has looked at the parks plan has come away with serious concerns about the point system. In Kensington-Talmadge, community volunteers came up with a novel way to express them: the severely park-deprived neighborhood's community group evaluated existing parks by the point system and created fictional parks on city land to demonstrate how the point system could lead to good scores for terrible parks. Under the new point system, the current parks bring the neighborhood to 17 percent of where it should be, with the goal of 180 points calculated at 12 points per 1000 residents. Add some amenities to the existing parks, and the neighborhood gets to 25 percent. Planning group members concocted four new park locations on city land, including small plots at Fairmont and Meade, Fairmont and El Cajon Boulevard, and even a dead end street called Miracle Drive. If cleared, of cyclone fence, weeds, barricades, and red diamond signs - the dead end would overlook a canyon. Add a viewpoint sign and a bench to the paved area, and it becomes worth at least three points toward Kensington-Talmadge's 180 required points, according to the point system. And the less-than-half-acre patch of Kensington Talmadge group chairman David Moty stressed that the 'new' parks are hypothetical, but notes that "the devil is in the details. The city could make this work really well or the city could cheat us out of the parks we need by park-packing and amenitizing things up."

#### LA JOLLA Signs, smells, and selfish selfies

**Pups, poop, people, and pix don't mix** It's sea lion pupping season at La Jolla Cove, and social distancing isn't working too well — at least not between humans and pinnipeds. Ellen Shively, Seal Society of San Diego volunteer, spent July 19 carrying a sign to help remind people to keep their distance. She also helped rescue a yearling that had seven fish hooks in its mouth. And she saw a crowd force three

pups off a cliff. The pups couldn't swim out of the crack, so the moms kept pushing them up on the rocks, she says. One mother seal sprang into action. "I actually saw her dive from the top after her pup fell." For over two hours, people who drove the pups off the edge watched, laughed, and took pictures, she says.

So what's the right distance from which to view a baby pinniped? Or a 1000-pound bull? The answers aren't clear from the signs posted at most entrances to the cove, which only warn against touching animals and advise staying

back. The Sierra Club Seal Society wants the city of San Diego to step back in. In 2017, San Diego's Parks and Recreation Department commissioned the Marine Coastal Management Plan-La Jolla to address the growing number of human/pinniped

encounters, and signs were one recommendation. The 91-page report also tackled the odor issues that prompted an unsuccessful lawsuit by business owners against the city. In the end, the pinnipeds prevailed. Sort of.

The signs are often ignored, even with splashy wording like "No Selfies with Seals!" People still touch and pet the animals, and still block their path to the ocean or beaches, advocates told the San Diego Environmental Committee last week. The situation is, they say,

"woefully under-managed." Shively blamed the use of small print, placed far above eye level, and wordy messaging. Some signs are faded, and none of them specify when pupping season arrives. Advocates worry that when people go down the stairs for a closer view, they may startle the animals, possibly causing the separation of mothers and newborns or raising the

risk of a pup drowning. The situation is "dire and dangerous" for both people and animals, they warn, recommending a specific distance be added to the signs, and also that a ranger and docent be there daily. Currently, there is only one ranger to monitor La Jolla Cove, La Jolla Point, and Boomer Beach.

Although sea mammals are federally protected from harassment by the Marine Mam-



enforced by the National Marine Fisheries Service — as well as municipal codes, tickets are rare. Robyn Davidoff, Sierra Club Seal Society docent, suggested that NOAA, the Coastal Commission, and the city of San Diego come up tective distance guide-

mal Act - which is

with a reasonable protective distance guideline, though exactly how far that is remains unsettled. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration — NOAA Fisheries — recommends a viewing distance of at least 150 feet. Shively says the best viewing spot for sea lions is the sidewalk in front of the Woman's Bridge Club at La Jolla Point (over 400 feet). The Sierra Club Seal Society draws the line at a minimum of 20 feet.

#### Preordained

- Justin Couch, 25, of Spring Hill, Florida, who sports a tattoo of a machete under his left eye, was arrested June 13, according to the Hernando (Florida) County Sheriff's Office, for allegedly attacking a man with a machete. The unnamed adult male victim told officers Crouch forced him out of the home where he'd been living and began arguing with him "for no reason," report-ed Fox13 News. As the man attempted to gather his belongings from the home, deputies said, Couch allegedly hit the victim with the flat side of the machete's blade, "then swung the machete at the victim's face," striking his arm with the blade as the man tried to ward off the blow. "The victim is currently unable to use or move his left hand due to the severity of the injury he sustained," investigators said. Couch was arrested for aggravated battery.

#### Sign of the Times

- A perfect storm may be brewing to strike down the long-maligned one-cent coin, the penny. Earlier this year, the U.S. Mint cut back on coin production to keep its workers safe amid the COVID-19 pandemic, reported NPR's Planet Money. At the same time, people stopped spending, especially with cash, and word of a coin shortage spread, prompting some stores, such as Kroger, to start rounding their prices to avoid making coin change. Last year, the mint made more than 7 billion pennies, almost 60% of its total coin production, and each one-cent coin cost TWO cents to

produce, putting the loss at more than \$72 million. Still, the mint has no plans to eliminate the coin. It's been up and running at full capacity since mid-June, and according to spokesman Michael White, about 40% of the coins it has produced since then have been pennies.

#### **Animal Lovers in Maine**

- Officers from the Somerset County (Maine) Sheriff's Department and the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency searched the apartment of Jessica Hutchins, 36, looking for drugs on July 13, which they found, according to Sheriff Dale Lancaster. "We also got an alligator out of her home," he told the Morning Sentinel. The 2-foot-long gator was being kept in Rubbermaid tubs, but, Lancaster said, having an alligator in Maine is illegal without proper permits. Of-ficers seized a total of \$12,000 worth of drugs along with the alligator, and Hutchins and several accomplices were charged with a number of drug-related crimes. The gator was removed by the Maine Warden Šervice.

#### **Angry Animals**

- Neighbors on Occidental Street in a North Oakland, California, are at odds over the presence of Bruce, aka Paco, aka Peter, aka Pierre, aka Abraham ... a peacock. While some residents are happy to welcome him, SFGate.com reported on July 15, others want him to move on and have lodged a complaint with the city. "For the past 15 weeks or so he has screamed relentlessly, every day," Jesse T. wrote on the Nextdoor app. "It liter-

ally feels like he is inside my house." The peacock is believed by Animal Control to be feral. But Dennis Fett of the Peacock Information Center in Minden, Iowa, thinks Bruce/Paco/Peter is providing a service. "They're like a watchdog," Fett said. "They have keen hearing. (The neighbors) should count their blessings.

#### **Bright Ideas**

- Yoshito Harada, 32, readily admitted to police in Higashiura, Japan, that he slashes women's car tires so he can then step up to "help" them fix their flats. On June 11, Oddity Central reported, a 43-year-old unnamed woman leaving a grocery store noticed that her tire was flat. As she pulled over, a man stopped his car and offered to help, but the woman had had a similar experience a year before and recognized the good Samaritan, so she contacted police. Officers viewed surveillance video from the market and saw Harada slashing the woman's tire just before she emerged from the store. Further investigation revealed Harada has a history of approaching women this way going back to 2013, and authorities believe he has pulled the stunt more than 1,000 times.

#### News That Sounds Like a Joke

- After falling asleep following a 10-bottle beer-drinking binge, and failing to heed nature's call for 18 hours, a 40-year-old Chinese man identified as Mr. Hu was diagnosed with a burst bladder, the New York Post reported on June 23. The man appeared at Zhuji People's Hospital in Zhejiang, China, complaining of searing abdominal pain, and doctors discovered three tears in his bladder, one of which had caused his intestines to spill into the bladder. Mr. Hu underwent emergency surgery and was able to recover. Zhuji officials said while bladder rupture is rare, they see at least one such patient every year.

#### **The Litigious Society**

- The Tampa Bay Times reports that Kris Hedstrom of Odessa, Florida, filed suit against her neighbor, Heather Dayner, in late May, demanding a paternity test for the five goats she purchased from Dayner or a full refund. Hedstrom bought the five Nigerian Dwarf goats – Bella, Gigi, Rosie, Zelda and Margoat - in December, paying \$900, and expected to register them with the American Dairy Goat Association, according to the lawsuit. Registered goats have higher value than nonregistered goats. But the ADGA denied Hedstrom's application because Dayner is not a member of the organization, and Dayner now accuses Hedstrom of trespassing on her farm and harassing her with calls to the police. "She's been a nightmare of a neighbor," Dayner said. Dayner plans to represent herself in court in July.

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continued from page 17 tension. For him, one division occurs in the desert between the off-road vehicle community and conservationists. Both groups love everything about the desert — the camping, the clear night skies, the scenery, the wildlife, the vegetation — except the off-roaders disrupt the fragile topsoil by riding across the land.

With pets, there's a similar divergence. He notes that people "take care of the animals, the same way I do." But what happens when they are bred and sold? "What's the motivation there? To make money or preserve them? I don't know of any case where they're contributing to their preservation."

And yet, Hollingsworth wants it understood that he believes the pet trade, like digital photography, will ultimately make reptile lovers love

reptiles in the wild as much as they do in deli cups. "The difference is one of nuance — and of intention."

If private breeders wanted to help the California Red-Legged frog, they would breed and reintroduce the species into the wild scientifically. One can't just dump an endangered animal into a habitat and hope it will repopulate their numbers. "Every introduced species will have a new genetic footprint." That new "invader" can easily, despite the good intentions of its advocates, "significantly alter an ecosystem"—what's been in a pond or under a rock for hundreds or thousands of years.

Perhaps the story here is that the pet trade and the museum trade, whose paths once paralleled, are now intersecting. The more captive breeds thrive in captivity and the more they escape, accidentally or on purpose, the more stress is put upon the natives. # Pandemic pet sales spike

In early March, pandemic-chastened, I cancel several in-person interviews and on-site tours of animal labs, critter mélanges, and field walks looking for herps. Only in late May do I get back on the pony—and even then, only by phone.

Loren Leigh of LLL Reptiles describes his facility in San Marcos. He estimates he has 2000 slots for 700 species of reptiles and amphibians, from common to exotic, which he's breeding. The animals are racked on shelves, in plastic pullout bins, "drawered like a dresser." Heating and lighting elements are built into each drawer. For the bigger animals, he uses macrobins, four by four feet, lightweight, transportable.

Reptile breeders are, to say the least, heavily hands-on — cleaning and changing enclosures, prepping food and feeding, selling and shipping to individuals or for expos, and

overseeing the seasonal breeding process, which, under captive conditions, follows natural contours of winter hibernation, warm-weather fattening, mating rituals, then letting females gestate and give birth, months later. Like Noah, Leigh pairs reptile species. "We're looking to take a trait of this animal," he says, "and breed it to a trait with another animal — to create new and exciting patterns and colors." Such is genetic breeding: mate a lizard with a stripe on its back to another lizard with little pink feet. Breeding answers the question, can those traits be combined? Often the answer is yes.

Perhaps surprisingly, in the pandemic, reptile sales are spiking, not decreasing. Why? Leigh says, "We're recessionproof because people turn

homeward during crises, and we're one of the few industries that's still mailorder." For the past three months, pet stores were deemed "essential." Pets need food (from crickets to frozen rodents), vet services, litter, lighting, and enclosures. "The government's not going to ask you get rid of your pet in a pandemic," Leigh says. "We're essential to help maintain the



livelihood of the animals you own."

Leigh says the pet store is really about human well-being. People want "to hang out, linger, spend time with animals." When schools closed, parents brought their kids in. "It's a safe place, like a zoo; people left home and came in to buy a pet. During a pandemic, they could," however briefly, "escape it all."

What of the worry that animals, especially from international breeders, may carry zoonotic viruses or crop-destroying bugs? He says "it's nothing new." Pandemics always ratchet up fears of disease transmission via vertebrates, and pet traders get blamed for the latest event. Just like avocadoes or lobsters from other countries, animals are screened and quarantined as necessary at one of four U.S. ports of entry, in facilities run by the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Of his industry, Leigh says, "we're not buying animals from these people," that is, "animals from the wild, crammed into cages and sold in food markets where bacteria are exchanged. Unfortunately, reptiles are considered wildlife worldwide; they're not protected like domestics, your hamsters and your dogs. So, we fall into the same category of import/export as a food item would."

One way to keep the pet trade safe and viable is to keep it in-country. Thus, captive breeding continues to grow. At the Del Mar Expo, I espied many creatures - chameleons whose skin changes color with moods and tarantulas who, when riled, flick urticating hairs at predators - that are "native" to Central America or Africa, but not necessarily imported. They are, so the salespeople told me,

bred here.

Finally, I wanted to know what Leigh thought of Brad Hollingsworth's suspicions that pet dealers and owners bear some responsibility for the growing number of nonnative species, released into and proliferating in our habitats — for example, the American bullfrog in the West and the Burmese python in Florida.

Leigh says he's dumbfounded that any dealer would let a Burmese python loose when the owner/breeder "could make \$20,000 selling that snake to a consumer." If a hurricane hits a zoo or towns are overrun by feral cats, the media sentence pet owners, sellers, and transporters to the gallows. "It's unfair." As for the American bullfrog, he faults the Fish and Wildlife Service for releasing the frog a century ago "as pest control. That had nothing to do with the escape of pet bullfrogs."

Animals of all stripes, whether Ruth's Chris Angus beef or Best in Show at Madison Square Garden, multiply exponentially under the human custom to have and to hold, to love and to groom, to sequester and to eat. For better and worse, there is a toll: 70 billion nonhuman creatures are "processed" (slaughtered) every year for human and animal consumption. I've never been able to fathom the irony that what defines our metabolic sustainability is what we love and what we eat.

#### Wild reptile rehab

A final post-Covid phone visit is with the San Diego Humane Society's Dr. Jon Enyart, veterinary director of the Wildlife Rehabilitation Center. The practice, which includes a hospital and "care rooms" for reptiles, birds, and mammals, rehabs some 12,000 animals yearly, two-thirds of which are avian, followed by large and small mammals. Only about one percent, 100 or so, are reptiles and amphibians.

With the latter, he deals exclusively with local natives, none from the pet trade. Those "companion animals," dogs and cats, turtles and rabbits - and ball pythons - are rehabbed, if necessary, and housed in the Humane Society's shelter as "stray holds." The hope, often redeemed, is that their guardians will retrieve and handle them more responsibly. If not, the animals "should be adopted out," Enyart says.

Ninety percent of the reptiles he treats consist of four species: the Pacific Gopher Snake, the California Kingsnake, the Southern Alligator Lizard, and the Western Fence Lizard. (Injured rattlesnakes are sent to a separate facility, in part, because of their venomousness.) Denizens of our canyons and mesas are triaged for trauma — sliced by weedwhackers, hit by cars, caught in garden netting or on glue traps. When a reptile's scales are lacerated, Enyart sews them up.

Reptiles make lousy patients, he says. Slow healers, they need to be sedated and often show scant verve even while on the mend. They miss their digs too much. The endgame is to release them within a mile of where they were rescued, away from nets and traps. Enyart also says the success rate nationwide for rehabbing and releasing all native wildlife is about 31 percent, meaning (sad to say) seven out of ten don't make it.
