

Tiny house > no house

Demo home demonstrates new shelter model

From the city to the unincorporated county, San Diego has of late made it cheaper and easier for homeowners to build an accessory dwelling unit, which can then be rented. But San Diego's granny flats aren't all that cheap. A Craigslist ad asks \$1700 for a 450-square-foot studio in North Park. Tiny houses present a smaller but less expensive option, and as zoning codes catch up with reality, they're becoming more than a rentable asset in a homeowner's backyard. They're forming villages - and serving as shelter for the homeless. On August 11, El Cajon, the city with



square feet of living space and a porch, but no plumbing. The church will make bathrooms, and possibly showers, available. (The tiny homes on wheels could have toilets and cooking facilities). Similar villages may follow. Staff is looking for residential properties of at least 1.5 acres, to expand the idea where zoning allows. So far they've identified 13 sites with the potential to yield more emergency housing.

the highest concentration of homeless in the East County, approved a pilot project unlike any other in the county: "One program that has not been fully explored in the San Diego region is tiny house communities" to shelter homeless individuals, a city of El Cajon staff report notes.

Short on beds to serve the homeless, El Cajon declared a shelter crisis emergency in 2018. The city council funded various homeless programs such as rapid re-housing, rental assistance, emergency housing, and partnerships with non-profits. Despite this, a recent homeless count found 784 people without shelter in El Cajon. Happily, in August 2019, volunteers from Amikas, a nonprofit that works with the homeless, built a tiny home demo on Meridian Baptist Church's property. The goal was to develop a community of up to six shelters. And since the property at 660 South Third Street wasn't zoned for the envisioned bridge housing and its wrap-around services, a zoning change was made.

The homes-to-be will have wheels, but accompanying framed cabins will require a building permit, which takes more time. The project will start with administrative approval and a zoning permit, and sunsets on December 2023. The first village of six homes will provide shelter for up to 90 days for homeless women, especially veterans, and their children. The 12 x 12 units have 96

Amikas president Shanna Welsh-Levin said they expect the pandemic to increase homelessness as jobs are lost or parents are forced to trade work hours for child care. The homes will be built in the coming months, and Welsh-Levin urges similar collaborations by other non-profits, property owners, and housing providers. "We hope the success of this pilot program will be replicated throughout the county of San Diego."

ENCINITAS Mavoral straw poll Never mind paper ballots, what about paper straws?

As of August 1, a city ordinance required the elimination of plastic straws by gas stations, take out, and drive-thru restaurants. Most have not complied.

The Speedway gas station at the I-5/Birmingham Drive exit in Cardiff by the Sea was one of the first to switch to paper straws in mid-June. "Customers hate them," said an area manager who asked not to be identified. "They [paper straws] dissolve in their mouths a few miles down the road, so customers are taking five at a time now," he said. "It's the little things like this that drive customers away," noting that other local businesses have not switched to paper straws. The manager stated he has over 5000 plastic straws stored

at the station that will be thrown away. "The company keeps sending them. I can't recycle them. I can't return them. Customers beg for them, but we can't give them out or we'll be fined."

While waiting to order at the McDonald's drive-thru on Encinitas Boulevard, Julia, from Cardiff, was asked what she thought of the paper straws she would be receiving with her order. "I hate them, hate them, hate them, hate them!" she exclaimed, stating she was

responding for the other three woman in her car, all of whom were nodding in agreement. "They [paper straws] are not recyclable," shouted one of the women from the backseat. (True, because of the wax content used in manufacturing paper straws. The plastics industry likes to point out it take more resources to make paper straws than plastic.) McDonald's is testing the use of paper straws at some locations in the U.S.; most North County McDonald's still use plastic straws. A San Marcos local posted on Facebook that because of the straw issue, she will no longer be purchasing food from the Encinitas McDonald's.

Steve Amster, owner of Garden State Bagels on El Camino Real, said he doesn't see a problem with paper straws. "The real

issue is why I can go to the supermarket and get a free vegetable plastic bag or pay 10 cents for a reusable plastic bag at checkout," Amster said. "Straws aren't a problem at the beach," chimed in one of Amster's customers.

Now there are indications that the straw issue may spill over into the Encinitas mayor's race in November. Incumbent and fourthgeneration Cardiffian Catherine Blakespear has a formidable challenger in Julie Thunder. Blakespear is known throughout the county as a populist mayor who focuses on a progressive agenda that takes in environmental, mobil-

ity, housing, and inclusionary issues. (Those that normally attend city council meetings in support of such issues love her, and hail the usual 5-0 council votes with "jazz hands," since clapping is discouraged at council meetings.) She was overwhelmingly reelected in 2018, capturing 85 percent of the vote. But now Blakespear is being accused by Thunder and others as being a friend of developers when it comes to state-mandated high density housing regulations, and criticized

for premature closure of both the city's Rail Train pedestrian walkway and beaches during the initial COVID crisis, as well as turning the city's vehicle roadways over to bicyclists through the narrowing addition of city-wide bike lanes and speed humps.

One McDonalds customer, when asked about paper straws in relationship to the mayor's race, joked, "This stupid paper straw thing is the final straw."

the cost of a few cans of marker spray paint. The impacts of unsafe and undue traffic impacts, compounded by public vehicle or pedestrian access to site trails, have also been ignored - especially for a stretch of road that has no sidewalks and missing bike lanes. Personal injury lawyers will have a field day when the inevitable traffic or pedestrian accidents occur, and it is learned that the city and the state decided to ignore project hazards. Hopefully the developer can be added when they name defendants in pursuit of six- and seven -figure settlements.

The Commission reported an ex parte meeting with Mayor Blakespear, presumably to discuss the City's approval despite the Commission's concern about waste and toxins (including DDT), so the developer stressed how hard he had worked - to help City staff help him.

The developer then boasted that he outclassed the Batiquitos Lagoon Foundation (BLF), saying they had refused to meet despite a call with the group just days before. He described the group as unsophisticated and lacking expertise - a small group of disgruntled activists. For decades, the nonprofit has managed the Batiquitos Lagoon with quiet diligence, directing tens of millions of dollars in improvements to restore the lagoon from a wasteland dotted by shopping carts to the healthy tidal lagoon it is today. Commission members did not allow Foundation representatives to rebut his statements.

The Sierra Club of San Diego delivered a stern warning about the importance of protecting the lagoon, but technical issues prevented it from being read.

There was time, however, for the developer to regale the Commission as they spoke fondly together of his efforts to keep Grandma Weston happy in her little house on the prairie, and to protect her from any hardships as the \$70 million dol-

lar project is built. I can still smell the apple pie on the window sill. Steve Locko

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IMPERIAL BEACH Eclipse fogged up A different sort of hornblower cruise

At midnight on August 2, some locals in Imperial Beach woke up to blaring foghorns. Residents chimed in on their Facebook accounts: "All boats underway have to blow their horns when fog comes in for nine seconds every two minutes because loss [of] visibility," said one person, "I just asked my husband, who is a boat captain." Another Facebooker responded that she heard the foghorns in Chula Vista, about eight miles northeast of the IB coastline.

"I live two miles away from the beach," said Cristbel Adams, "and the horns [sounded] like the ship was next to my house, it was loud. At the beginning, I thought it was my cell phone or my neighbor's fax machine." Adams, a freelance copywriter, mother, and housewife, has lived in IB for about five years. "I never heard something like this, and the



horn was on and off throughout the night."

"It started around 9 pm [on April 1]," said April Olthoff. "They were loud, but in the distance, and it happened every three minutes, obviously for safety reasons." Olthoff, 30, has lived in IB her whole life; she's never heard the foghorns here, either. "I was taking care of my dog after we got home from the emergency vet that night; [we were] up all morning. At about 2-3 am, they sounded farther away as if the ship turned and the horns weren't facing directly towards shore. It was foggy, and it was zero percent visibility. The horns were on and off throughout the night. Some people said it was a Navy ship and other ships, but I don't know."

NF has lived in IB for about 50 years. Like Olthoff and Adams, she's never heard the audible fog warnings here. "It sounds like two ships signaling to one another: [one] short, one long and one medium blast. We've never had two cruise ships anchored off the shore for four months. They are making sure the other ship knows where they are."



IB has heard the horns at midnight.

Olthoff and NF referred to the Celebrity's Eclipse and Millennium cruise ships, which have been anchored off their city's shoreline since the CDC suspended cruise ship sailings around the U.S. on March 14. "A third ship, the Disney Wonder, was anchored in San Diego remained quarantined on the Eclipse, along with hundreds of crew members."

"Both ships are down to minimal staffing levels of about 80 crew members to maintain the vessels and keep them operational," said Royal Caribbean Cruises spokesman Jonathon

for the first few months of the pandemic, but departed May 30," ABC News 10 San Diego reported on July 3. "After thousands of passengers disembarked from the Eclipse in late March, test results came back showing several passengers were COVID-19 positive. 

HILLCREST Mad about MAD Business districts steamed over supposedly stolen signs

More than 800 San Diegans have petitioned San Diego City Councilmember Chris Ward to step in on a tug of war that pits Hillcrest and El Cajon Boulevard business districts against what they see as a stealth move funded by a developer to create an overlay tax authority on parts of their districts. Neighborhood assessment district wizard Marco LiMandri is planning an L-shaped maintenance assessment district, tentatively called the West End, that stretches from east of Texas Street down El Cajon to Park, includes the San Diego Unified School District property north to Meade and west to Campus, and then heads south on Park to Robinson. It also grabs up the triangle formed by Park, University and Normal Street - including the coming Normal Street Promenade and the H.G. Fenton infill project planned for Harvey Milk and Normal Streets. (LiMandri and staff at New City America Inc. did not respond to requests for comment.)

Benjamin Nicholls, executive director of the Hillcrest Business Improvement Association, called the proposed district 'a gerrymandered map' last week when he sent out an email urging people to "Save the Pride Plaza." "The pride flag will not be in Hillcrest, it will be in the west end," he wrote. "Why do we need this now? Because it's easier to pass a tax when no one is paying attention. If they can grab the valuable parts of the neighborhood here, they can do it anywhere."

"They" is developer H.G. Fenton, which has just completed the 165-apartment project BLVD on El Cajon Boulevard between Alabama and Florida streets. A second, an 82-unit project at Harvey Milk and Normal streets, is in the planning stages. Disclosures filed with the city clerk for January to June 2020 indicate that Fenton staff began weighing in on the Promenade project more than a year ago. Since at least March 2019, according to city lobbyist disclosures, Fenton executives have been meeting with Ward staffers Molly Chase and Brittany Bailey about the formation of the "El Cajon Boulevard BIA," though it isn't clear exactly when the idea of what LiMandri is calling a "community benefit district" emerged. Fenton, in the disclosures, describes their lobbying as: support planning and execution of the proposed Normal Street Promenade that enhances placemaking and

This week, we visit what *realtor.com* promotional materials describe as a "sophisticated coastal contemporary farmhouse" sitting on just over a quarter-acre of land at 900 Alameda Boulevard in Coronado.

Custom-built in 2013, the home was designed by local architect Christian Rice and custom-built by Lorton Mitchell, both islandbased contractors. With seven bedrooms, seven full baths and three powder rooms, there's more

than 8300 square feet of living space under roof including a detached guest house and finished basement.

"The beautiful spaces

in the home are designed to engage the courtyard with pool and spa, lending a sense of openness and light to the home," the listing continues. Indeed, massive walls of glass retract to open the kitchen and dining area to the outdoor living space focused around that private courtyard. "The orientation of the 'L' shaped main home and linear guest house and covered patio" create that space on the "relatively large, yet unusually shaped lot."

"The aesthetics take inspiration from the simple, clean lines of a traditional 'A-frame' barn, intermixed with sleek, minimal detailing that gives the home a contemporary flair."

Building material and color selections were made to "reflect the bright, vibrant hues and textures of the seaside locale." Some of those choices include white oak hardwood flooring, Quartzite, marble, and custom tile installations, along with board-andbatten wood paneling. Other features include automated window coverings and the Fleetwood door system, multi-zoned climate control system, backlit bathroom mirrors, and custom builtin cabinetry in the office and playroom.

The "gourmet kitchen" includes two islands and features Wolf and Subzero appliances, including a pair of dishwashers. There's an entire second kitchen outside under the covered loggia adjacent to the guest house (which, of course, has a third kitchenette).

To maximize the living space on the lot, a finished basement houses two en-suite bedrooms in addition to a sitting room, game room, private theater, and wine tasting area. The main level owner's retreat includes a "spa-like bathroom and closet system" along with a second office area. The *continued on page 37*

Maggie Sepeda is an avid traveler who spent a good part of the last three years (pre-pandemic) exploring the other side of the world. Along the way, instead of souvenirs, she collected tattoos. "I love tattoos," she enthuses, "because to me, they are an extension of who a person is. It's an art form, a statement, and a community."

I ask her to tell me her favorites, and she starts with the black and white sunflower tattoo that adorns her right hand. (Queen Bee Tattoo, Springfield, Oregon, \$400). "I

got the sunflower because for one, I'm a Leo, and I feel a strong connection to the sun and all things sunny. It's also my favorite flower, and I've had a lot of meaningful coincidences involving sunflowers throughout my life." Eugene, Oregon is where Maggie spent 10 years of her adolescence, and a city, she says, where tattoos are a lot more common and accepted than the typical U.S. town.

The tattoo directly above the sunflower portrays an abstract hand (Elysian Tattoo, Perth, Western Australia, \$180), which Maggie got on a flash tattoo day. It was tattooed by artist Tahlia Undarlegt, who also happened to design and create the spotted stingray that wraps around the middle of Maggie's arm (Elysian Tattoo, Perth, Australia, \$430). "The stingray was inspired by my time living in my favorite place in the world, Coral Bay, Western Australia. It's a tiny beach town on the Indian Ocean in the middle of nowhere, surrounded by the Australian desert. 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
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The Mitchells' four-year chicken journey has been a bonding experience, Carrie says. "When we got them, we just looked at them as providers of eggs," she says. "We didn't realize they were going to become pets, but then we named them and, well, they became our pets."

Who's going to clean the chicken yard?

This is a story about chickens and the ordinary people, like me, who raise them in their backyards. It's a story that is centered around trendy buzzwords such as "sustainable living" and "urban farming" – and connected to the COVID-19 pandemic because, with so many more people stuck at home, it appears that backyard chicken farming is more popular than ever.

The Country Feed Store in Vista normally sells about 500 chicks a week,

says Cat Womack, who has worked there for the last 18 years. The second week of the pandemic, she says, "we set a new record: 550 chicks in five and a half hours. That was the same time schools were closed and parents needed something to keep their kids busy."

Robert Maudsley, a 54-year-old tech support engineer who launched the San Diego Backyard Chickens Facebook page in 2017, says that after the stayat-home orders were handed down, "I started going from one or two new members every couple of weeks to sometimes getting 10 a day. And the only thing I can figure is that everyone's home and looking for something to do, and raising backyard chickens is pretty easy."

His page currently has more than 2700 members.

"Chicken ownership, for sure, is on the increase," says Heather Thelen, who has owned and operated the Hawthorne Country Store in Escondido for 22 years. "Let's say you've got a family and you've been thinking about chickens. Now, you're stuck at home for several months on end, so now is the time - and the kids are home as well, to go through the whole process, watch them grow up, clean up, learn socialization."

The covid-induced surge in backyard chicken farming comes after more than a decade of steadily increasing sales of baby chicks and supplies, from chicken feed to chicken coops.

Thelen says that over the last 10 years, chicken sales have increased by about 15 percent per year. "Normally, we bring in 4000 chicks for Chicks Day, our annual sale, and then 500 to 800 chicks every two weeks," she says.

Thelen and Womack both attribute the growing popularity of backyard chicken farming to the move toward sustainable living and urban agriculture that began in the mid-2000s and accelerated when celebrities began posting photos of home flocks on social media. Lately, a number of reality shows also have featured backyard chickens, including the 2016 Amazon Original *Backyard Chicken Coops*, the Discovery Channel's *Coop Dreams*, and the YouTube channel *Becky's Homestead*, which has nearly 420,000 subscribers.

Locally, the trend started accelerating in January of 2012, when the city of San Diego amended its municipal code to allow residents of single-family homes to keep and maintain chickens. The number of fowl allowed varies depending on the size of the lot and zoning, but generally, most single-family homes are allowed up to five chickens, provided the chicken coop is in the backvard, at least five feet from side property lines and 13 feet from the rear property line.

Today, 17 of the 18 cities within San Diego County allow chickens, with most limiting ownership to hens, since roosters, with their early-morning crowing, tend to trigger noise complaints. The only exception is Coronado, where the city council last addressed the issue in December 2011 by voting to uphold a longstanding ban on chickens and other barnyard creatures, maintaining that lots in the city are too small to make chicken farming practical. "We have to protect people who don't want these critters next to them," Councilman Mike Woiwode said at the meeting. If the ban is lifted, he said, "these people will lose the ability to control their environment."

County Supervisor Dianne Jacob, perhaps the county board's biggest champion of agriculture, applauds the growth in chicken farming. "I think it's fantastic and healthy for people to be able to grow their own chickens, whether it's for the eggs or to eat," she says. "And it helps kids... learn about where food comes from and how to grow it. There's always something good that comes out of a tragic situation like the one we're in right now, and I think this is one of the very positive things." With COVID-19

further fueling interest in backyard chicken farming, Thelen says that until recently, she had trouble keeping up with the demand, due to limits on chicken sales in Los Angeles, Riverside, and San Bernardino counties by state and federal health officials. Chickens in those three counties were under a Virulent Newcastle Disease quarantine, jointly imposed by the California Department of Food and Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Virulent Newcastle Disease is a virus that affects birds, particularly poultry,



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striking their digestive, nervous and respiratory systems. The latest Newcastle outbreak was detected in May 2018 in Los Angeles County. By December, the virus had spread extensively in backyard poultry in the Los Angeles basin and also infected commercial flocks. After prolonged disease control efforts, the last confirmed positive case was detected in February 2020. The quarantine was lifted on June 1, a move that once again allowed poultry to move freely within the state.

"The lifting of the quarantine really helped," Thelen says. "We can once again bring in birds from trusted hatcheries and also bring in a greater variety of birds. During the quarantine, it was very difficult. We had to drive on the 8 to Arizona to avoid the quarantine area, and we were only able to bring back 300 to 500 birds, at the most, on each trip."

Since the lifting of the quarantine, Thelen says, sales have once again been at an all-time high. The Hawthorne Country Store sells most breeds of chickens for \$8 a bird from birth to two weeks of age. The price goes up by a few dollars

every two weeks, maxing out at \$50 when the chicken is four to five months old.

A similar pricing structure exists at the Country Feed Store. "There's much more of an abundance of chicks right now due to the lifting of the quarantine," Womack says. "Before, a lot of stores only had adult hens. But now we can get baby chicks in the mail again."

Womack says topselling breeds are Rhode late 1800s, known for their above-average size and docile dispositions. "But there are over 100 breeds, and as people become more interested and do more research, they might find other breeds that are better suited for them. Some want dualpurpose birds, for eggs and for meat, while others just want them for their eggs."

Thelen cautions that "the most popular breeds and what we recommend are two different things. We really want to focus on people having a sucthat. For example, a lot of people want Silkies or Brahmas, or something really different, like Polish Crested, with big hairy heads. But we also know those breeds are not pre-sexable at the hatchery, so you run the risk of rooster problems. The other thing is people want breeds they know. They will ask for a Rhode Island Red when maybe a New Hampshire Red or a Buckeye would make a better pet, because they're not so aggressive. The Plymouth Rock is another super fun breed, and so is the Black Australorp, which does really well in heat."

Aside from running a feed store, Thelen has long been an advocate of home chicken flocks. "We feel very strongly that it's important for people to raise some of their own food for health, for enjoyment, and so we don't lose those home skills that are a part of our heritage. What happens is, everyone gets comfortable, and it's cheaper to buy at the store, so we've kind of gotten away from doing things ourselves."

"Chickens make a lot of people happy," Womack adds. "And for families, they can teach kids responsibility and really tighten the bonds between family members. It's surprising how many kids have never seen a live chicken. It's pretty fascinating watching kids come and get chicks and chicken supplies with their parents."

Thelen says "there are things you can do to affect the quality of the eggs. You can get an Omega Plus type of feed and the eggs will be higher in healthy fatty acids, or a purely organic feed."

Beyond eggs, Thelan says, "They're kind of fun. We call them pets with benefits. I have one customer who goes out every morning and has coffee with her chickens. She loves doing it, and I can understand that. It just becomes part of your world, like petting your cat."

A pile of dead chickens Back in the summer of 2010, I traveled to the southern Chinese city of Guiyang for work. I had plenty of free time to explore the city of more than 4 million, and while walking near Qian Ling Park, known for its roaming monkeys, I came across a chicken man selling freshly slaughtered and plucked fowl from a pull cart. I was so fascinated I had my oldest son, Justin, who was traveling with me, take a picture of us.

Looking back, I still don't quite know what captivated me about

this man and his pile of dead chickens. I suppose chickens have always intrigued me. Years ago, as a little boy, my Mama took me to the San Diego Zoo virtually every Saturday. At the time, chickens - Rhode Island Reds - roamed freely, particularly in the long-gone Monkey Yard area. My greatest joy was feeding them bits of bread we had brought along for the goats in the Petting Corral. Other kids would always chase the chickens. This infuriated me. "Stop chasing the chickens!" I'd yell. I spent hours at the hatchery in the Children's Zoo, where you could pick up baby chicks as soon as they crawled out of the egg.

Fast forward to 2020. Most everyone I know has started a vegetable garden, and I'm finding that a growing number of my friends and acquaintances have begun raising chickens.

So one day in early July, I'm scrolling through Nextdoor on my iPhone. I'm getting tired of people sniping at each other for not wearing masks, bemoaning the latest salon shutdown order, and complaining about dogs peeing on their front lawns. I turn to the "for sale" section, and right there at the very top is someone offering "four egglaying hens" with coop, nesting boxes, feeder and water dish, all for \$40. I text the number to see if the chickens are still available, then tell him I am leaving for the Grand Canyon for four days, and if they are still available when I return, I may pick them up.

I go on Facebook and pose the question to my friends: Should I get chickens? Within

a few hours, I've gotten 24 responses, most of them affirmative. Observation: there's no political divide here. Among those telling me to forget it are a diehard Trumpist and a liberal mother of three with a bad case of Trump Derangement Syndrome, both of whom say chickens attract rats and piss off the neighbors. But 16 responses are positive, including the mayors of both Poway and Encinitas.

On the drive home from the Grand Canyon, I get a text from the hen seller that says, "Still interested?" I text back yes, and a day later my 18-year-old son Hunter and I pick up the chickens, the coop, and the other accessories. Their new home: a fenced off portion of my side yard, with plenty of sunshine and a high wall so the chickens can't fly the coop.

Lucy means food

Joe Donnelly and his wife Pam have been raising chickens in the backyard of their San Marcos home for more than a decade. They bought their first two chicks when daughter Julia, now 20 and a UCLA student, was 9.

"We got them for Julia, two baby chicks just a few days old," says Joe Donnelly, a 54-yearold executive with a healthcare IT firm. "She wanted to take care of them." One was a blackand-white Barred Rock named Oreo, and the other a reddish-black Ameraucana, known for laying light blue eggs. "She was a spastic chicken," Pam Donnelly says. He name was Zoey.

Julia took care of the chickens in a cardboard box covered with chicken wire, kept in the garage, until they were eight weeks old. In the meantime, Joe, Pam, and Pam's father built an outdoor chicken coop, four feet by four feet and tall enough to stand in. It included a perch and nesting boxes. and was attached to an eight-foot-long "run," four feet wide and high.

The original Donnelly chickens lived for eight and ten years, respectively. After the second one died in 2019, Pam Donnelly says, she was going to toss out the coop, since Julia was going away for college, but relented, "because my dad built it with Joe, and it's just the memory of my dad, who passed away three years ago." When the pandemic was declared, Julia moved back home, and two months later the Donnellys got three more chickens: a Speckled Sussex (so called because of the white spangles on the ends of its dark mahogany feathers) named Tulip; a Black Australorp, Petunia; and a Golden Sexlink, yellow and white, named Lily. They were purchased from the Country Feed Store in Vista and the Hawthorne Country Store in Escondido.

"They're all friendly, with mild temperaments," says Pam.

The Donnelly chickens eat organic chicken feed and table scraps. "We feed them leftover lettuce and vegetables and tomatoes that are going bad," says Joe Donnelly. Pam adds, "And they go crazy for snails."

Joe Donnelly concedes one downside of raising backyard chickens is the stench. "Yes, they can smell, especially if you don't keep the coop fairly clean," he says. "But what we do is add a deodorizer: Stall Refresher & Pet Deodorizer from Sweet PDZ. They sell it in feed stores — it's used in horse stalls — and that takes away the smell."

I remember the warnings I got about rodents. Again, Donnelly has solution: "I make sure I have plenty of [rat] bait stations around, so it's not really a problem."

Marc and Carrie Mitchell, 47 and 45, are both in the car business. They live in Carlsbad, and bought their first chickens four years ago. "Marc is the one who brought it up. He thought it would be neat," Carrie says. "I think what prompted it was that our son, Jimmy, was eating a couple *continued on page 35*

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pedestrian/bicyclist experience and creates positive impacts for surrounding properties while retaining appropriate access to future development sites. When and why it shifted to the hybrid, which resembles a maintenance assessment district, isn't clear.

The city's map of business improvement districts shows a gap between the Boulevard and Hillcrest business districts, but the proposed maintenance assessment district snatches out pieces of both. North Park already has a maintenance assessment district, managed by the Parks and Recreation Department; that starts a block east of Park and goes east to the 805, south to Juniper and north to Monroe. These districts are voted into existence by the businesses and property owners that live within them. Their votes are weighted by the size of the property, such that the votes of a single large land owner — like Fenton in the proposed district — can make it far easier to impose the "fees" on all properties in a district. The districts have become a way to provide enhanced services to areas hampered by low real estate tax income — though the courts have been clear that the services must be ones that go above and beyond what the

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city is required to provide.

The Boulevard's executive director Tootie Thomas says the plan usurps work already done with money raised from its members – starting with the branding of the area as the West End and the iconic Boulevard sign. "He is carving off parts of our district and calling for the use of our brand marketing and parking funds," Thomas says. "That's not just a MAD, and it's got us mad." The existing business districts are particularly irritated that LiMandri will operate the proposed district while he runs a for-profit corporation that will take up to \$120,000 a year in administrative costs according to a letter he sent in April - from people already paying fees to existing nonprofit districts. Fenton, meanwhile, answered a spate of questions through spokeswoman Margie Newman confirming its apartment projects are in the proposed district but holding it at arms' length. "Neither the Normal Street Promenade nor The West End are H.G. Fenton Company projects. We would direct you to CCM Ward's office or New City America, respectively, for information specific to their projects," Newman wrote in an email.

Sources say that Ward is sending out emails saying he is not involved in the proposal, which is being reviewed by the City Attorney, and his response seems to indicate he is neutral on the proposal. "Both MADs would be beneficial in this area, as it has long struggled with needs for additional services and resources that the City does not provide," according to Ward's communications manager Jake Estrada. "MADs do not create new neighborhoods, and regardless of any new MAD, the HBA retains control over the Pride Flag."

She and her bandmate/ husband Scott used it to launch Dane Coffee in 2014, roasting a pound at a time to provide beans to local retailers, make the occasional coffee beer collaboration, and appear at a handful of farmers markets.

As 2016 approached, the Clarks looked forward to the arrival of both a new, larger coffee roaster and their first child. Someday, they told me, they would set up a little café for their fledgling coffee enterprise. But the homespun busi-

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ness wasn't in much of a hurry. As Scott said, they would take "baby steps."

Last year, that someday finally arrived, and they started looking for retail locations in the North Park area. The micro-roaster had established a following in its home neighborhood, with Dane Coffee beans retailing in the likes of Barons grocery store and Parkside Market. But as Dane steadily added other neighborhood groceries - such as Windmill Farms in Del Cerro, and Stumps Family Marketplace in Point Loma — the two-pound roaster in the Clarks' kitchen starting working overtime.

"We had to get out of our kitchen, basically," says Brielle with a laugh, "Our production was building pretty fast, and the neighbors started to wonder what was happening."

A friend turned them on to the growing emphasis on locally owned businesses at La Mesa's Grossmont Center mall, and eight months ago, they signed a lease on a small storefront. They moved roasting operations into the shop, and were readying for a spring opening when the pandemic hit.

Although covid ups and downs left them paying rent on a retail storefront they couldn't open yet, it also brought a silver lining. "I got even more busy," Brielle tells me, "because people were drinking more coffee at home."

Beef three-way for Bedford

t's that meat slicer. Whirring away. If it hadn't

been for the thin waves of blushing beef it was peeling off, I would have manfully resisted the temptation. Instead, here I am, inside Thorn's awesome Barrio Logan beer-brewing barn with a wicked little bar hiding in the corner, and one particular IPA calling out my name.

Sigh. "Hopster Pot, please," I say. "The hazy one."

"Are you ordering food?" says the guy behind the bar. Luis. He has long plaited braids. Oh yeah. Food. Covid law. "I could get you a \$5 ticket towards a MishMash item," he says. I know MishMash is a burger/taco/sandwich joint not far off National

> Did somebody mention meat in this bun?

Avenue here.

Then again, the meat slicer. The meat folding down in flaps does look pure pink and delicious. "Big Jim's New England Roast Beef, \$14," says the sign.

Wow. Fourteen dollars for a sandwich? That's the price of two Hopster Pots.

"It's good, though," says Luis. "Or you could spend \$5 on a MishMash certificate."


What the heck. May as well try the New England roast beef. Specially as I'm getting the "New England style" IPA, the Hopster Pot. I pay up, get the receipt, head out past two sidewalk tables filled with guys slurping and joshing away on tall stools. NASSCO shipbuilders, look like.

I show my receipt to the two guys at the white pop-up tent. One's supervising the slicing, the other's wrapping up a sandwich.

Except it's not a sandwich. "It's called a 'North Shore Beef Three-Way," says the burly slicer, Jim. "You Big Jim?"

"Yup," he says. Has to be from the Northeast. Big on action, small on talk.

"Three-way?" says the other guy, Kevin. Sounds a little, you know, hey hey! A little pepper in the social life. "What does that involve?" I ask.



"Three-way is beef with all the toppings: mayo, white American cheese, and sauce, James River BBQ sauce." "Oh, right," I say.

"Sounds good."

His name's Kevin. He and Big Jim started this up after they were both furloughed as prep chefs because of covid. Have been buddies ever since they grew up in North Shore, Mass.

"There're a lot of New England transplants here," says Jim. "Refugees from lousy weather. They come to us for a little bit of home."

He says he had four guys roll up recently. They bought 13 Three-Ways. Said these were their first for 3000 miles. That's how far San Diego is from Boston.

"And another gent drove down from LA. Got out of his car in a Red Sox jersey and bought six. Said these were his first in three years. Jumped in his car and drove straight back to LA."

"So you get regulars?"

"We get regulars," says Big Jim. Kevin hands me my — I try to say sandwich, but Jim interrupts me. "Nuhuh," he says. "It's a Beef. A North Shore Beef Three-Way. The boys back home are pretty particular."

I haul it off to the last table, where I left my New England-style Hopster Pot IPA. And, have to say, yes, total's \$21, but what a combo. The Beef is a massive pile, warm, as tender as a kiss, so nice and savory. The cut is top round, or sometimes bottom round that da boyz slow-cook right here for four hours at 300 degrees, then, only after you order, slice it up. "We have to be careful," says Jim. "It gets very floppy and soft when you break down all the connective tissue. But if we full-slice it, it ends up too thick. If we set it too thin, it disintegrates. It's an art. If we get it wrong, our regulars from Back East will let us know. But if we get it right, there's no pull when you eat it. It almost chews itself."

Cheese add is good, and of course, the James River sauce is crucial for its "not too thick, not too sweet, not too hard, peppery tang," as Jim puts it. Hmm. Jim, James, James River Sauce — any connection? Kevin says it has near-legendary status around Boston and North Shore, but Jim ain't a scion of that family.

"We got 100 gallons shipped over," he says. "That's partly what puts our costs up. People won't accept a substitute."

After the meat and the sauce, the most important umami element comes from the onion roll bun. Those savory chips of toasted root vegetable on top stop the meat from being bland.

And, have to say, the Hopster Pot IPA works well with the victuals. It is gentle, persuasive,

fruity even. Luis says the Back East IPAs tend to be that way. Specially the hazies. Hazy's a Vermont invention. That's where boys and girls started putting in things like oats and wheat and never got around to filtering them out. All of this started five years ago. Plus, they used hops for their flavor more than their bitterness. They let you off easy.

Whatever, this Hopster Pot and the Three-Way are a match made in New England heaven. I can see why sandwich pilgrims — uh, North Shore Beef pil-

grims — make their way here.

These guys also pop up their tent at Poor House Brewing Company in North Park on Sundays from 12:30. "But we're usually out by two, three. We just cook one round."

I guess there is something about the gentle flavors from Back East. You get so used to being whacked about the jowls by our local flavor gods. Maybe we've lost something.

Overall, I leave thinking I've discovered not so much a pop-up as a religion. And hey, I'm a believer. ■

At last! A visit to Sunnyboy Biscuit Company

Sunnyboy Biscuit Co.; 3749 Park Blvd, Hillcrest. If there were an alternate timeline, in which

a pandemic never showed up to close local restaurants, I'd have been happily feasting on biscuit breakfast sandwiches all throu

breakfast sandwiches all through the spring and summer.

Alas, it took me months to overcome the distractions of our current surreality to finally make it over to Sunnyboy Biscuit Company. The small business got going in January, filling in the triangular fifth corner where Robinson and Park meet, in Hillcrest.

You could be forgiven for thinking there's not much to a biscuit. But if you really give it some thought, biscuits are more often bad than good. Most are too dense, or not dense enough, or rock hard, or fall apart when you butter them. Sunnyboy's biscuit land in the proverbial sweet spot, good enough to order straight up at \$3.50 apiece, to be eaten with whipped butter and a berry compote (which is like jam, but fresher and fruitier).

However, Sunnyboy finds myriad ways to tempt us to his biscuit counter, and to the outdoor seating more recently installed outside the

restaurant. Sandwiches of rosemary fried chicken — breaded light, flaky — are dressed with

maple syrup (\$12), topped with horseradish slaw (\$14, with a side of deviled eggs), or paired with bacon and smothered in sausage gravy (\$16). Beef fans may go country-fried steak or smoked brisket, and hipsters may toast up their biscuit with smashed avocado.

Variations of these ingredients appear in weekend specials, including a country-fried steak "country benedict," or brisket hashed with onions and peppers.

Personally, I could not be more pleased with the sausage and egg breakfast sandwich, topped by melted cheddar and just a taste of that rich country

gravy. It scratches my every breakfast sandwich itch, and so good I can't even trip over its \$12 price tag (bacon and veggie patty options are available).

But to see how far a biscuit can go, head for the dessert-friendly biscuits brulee (\$13.50) — a pair of biscuits dipped in vanilla bean custard, baked crispy, and smothered in strawberries and maple whipped cream. You need a sweet tooth to appreciate this one, and if it hadn't been for this dag blasted coronavirus, you'd probably already know that.

The blue-ribbon sweets of Albie Candy Co

Sweet news, everybody! San Diego may have missed out on a county fair this year, but thanks to a burgeoning farmers market business, we can still sample the wares of last year's best-in-class candy maker.

Native San Diegan, Albie Asmussen is the man behind Albie Candy Co.. Previously, this candy maker co-founded the now defunct Oddball Candy Company. Since taking top honors at both the county and state fairs last year, he's secured a cottage kitchen license and built an adorable, vintage looking trailer small enough to park in ten-by-ten farmers market stalls.

I spotted the trailer and its "We [heart] candy" signage at the Hillcrest Sunday market, though it's also a regular at La Mesa's Friday market and Vista's Saturday market, with occasional appearances in North Park and Santee.

Albie's cart displays large, rainbow swirl lollipops, assorted jarred candy such as jelly beans, gummies, and gumdrops. But the best reason to check it out is the homemade fudge. Small bars include chocolate peanut butter and mint chip. Vegan flavors include hazelnut and rocky road. Each bar goes for \$4, or you can get three for \$10.

I had to try the 2019 county fair winner, maple walnut, a maple syrup fudge laced with chopped walnuts and a "hint of smoky bacon." I was initially surprised by the lack of chocolate, but Albie says roughly half his fudge recipes are chocolate-free, including cookies n' cream and Irish cream.

The maple walnut more than satisfied me, but the kids preferred something simpler: a crumbly old fashioned fudge, based on the recipe of Albie's great-grandmother. We all agreed the milk chocolate toffee crunch was our favorite, due to its "buttery toffee" and "hint of almond." The dark chocolate toffee crunch is that much better, to the grown-ups anyway.

The state fair winner, a root beer float fudge, sounds intriguing enough, and though Albie hasn't seen it sell well in the past, he may re-introduce it before the summer's end, as a refreshing warm weather



"It was an old-style elevator with the large up-down handle once cranked by operator, and the car had lots of brass.... [The owners] were very angry about that, and even more upset when they couldn't get a permit to restore it and wound up with an ugly, sterile, broken elevator."

Whitehead — whose office was atop the Balboa Theater downtown, and whose employers lived parttime at the nearby Hotel San Diego and ran Pussycats in El Cajon, National City, and downtown - recalls "A murder happened in the club and, after the police left, the chalk outline of the body was painted with Day-Glo paint. It was still there the last time I was in the building in 1989, after the club was gone."

into the legit Off Broadway stage — the club was founded by Scotsman Brendan Mullen, who moved to California from London in 1973 to take a lease on the 10,000-square-foot, \$850-a-month basement nuke shelter. Frequently raided by police, the venue hosted early gigs by Black Flag, the Ramones, X, the Dead Kennedys, and other seminal punk acts. The Masque was shut down in 1978, though it surfaced again in 1979, at another locale, before vanishing for good. Mullen later opened clubs including the Other Masque and Club Lingerie.

the inside track

Local Black Market Magazine publisher Carl Schneider, who filmed a documentary about San Diego illustrator "Mad" Marc Rude, recalls "When I was working on the documentary, I interviewed Brendan Mullen, he had a few Marc stories but they never made it in the documentary. But knowing his history, and since I had all the equipment setup, I asked him if he wouldn't mind talking about his involvement with the L.A. punk scene and about the Masque. He was really cool and was more than happy to do it, I got two hours of him talking about the early punk scene, as well as how he started the Masque. After that interview, I had thoughts about doing a documentary about Brendan, but sadly he passed away not too long

Until the Showtime documentary, many may have been unaware that the Go-Go's started off as punk. "I was one of those 11-year-old kids who saw them on Saturday Night Live and bought the album immediately," says Zachary Goode (Geezer, Secret Seven). "It's interesting that everyone is still alive and looks pretty good: past and present band members, managers, everyone. Can't say that about too many bands that started in the '70s."

Hip-hop goes postal

On July 1, the United States Postal Service issued a new set of stamps composed of four hip-hop designs based on the four elements of the lifestyle: rapping, DJing, break dancing, and graffiti art.

"Since [hip-hop's] inception more than four decades ago," says the independent agency of the U.S. government, "the electrifying music, dance, and art movement has profoundly influenced American and global popular culture."

How is the local hip-hop scene receiving them?

"This set could've been done a skosh better, like mix a different set of colors for each exact stamp," said J-Ski, a Chula Vista hip-hop dancer and artist. "They should've consulted with a few more of us hip-hop fans or historians." Briskone, a local graffiti

artist, reacted, "Graffiti is a letter-based art-form, specifically style based. The graffiti art stamp doesn't represent any of that; I feel the other elements of hip-hop were done justice. Maybe using an image of an individual in the act of painting would've worked better."

A week prior to interviewing with Brisk. he painted an abstract mural of his name on an El Cajon wall, with his buddies watching.

"I am glad that they used a female on the graffiti art stamp, because I feel that females don't get enough recognition in the culture. [But] the female graffiti artist on the stamp is non-representative with high fashion 'cutesie' looking shoes, rather than 'get ready to bolt' sneakers."

FALLING DOVES

Chris Leyva's band Falling Doves has a new EP called *Isolation*, the first of a planned three-volume set. "I was approached during the pandemic by my labels, both in the US and UK, and management to do virtual concerts or do covers, and I agreed to do the covers," says Leyva of the EP. "Warm Audio's Royce Richmond sent me some recording gear, to help me deal with a really bad depression I was going through, along with a lot of people, so I agreed to go into my vault and just start pulling tracks and finishing them. Each one of these songs was special, because every time, I had a breakup, [and] the song marks the time."

A STRAY CATALYST

Some recordings date back 15 years, but Leyva says they remained unreleased "because it was too painful. And it got better, so I abandoned them." Sporting sleeve art by Romanian illustrator Andrei Stan, *Isolation* features covers like Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah" ("Basically, crying of the soul for loving the ghost of a memory"), Oasis "Wonderwall" ("A plea of hope and love and salvation"), and "Ships Out to Sea" by The Be Good Tanyas, which concerns a man who commits suicide and goes to Hell. "It's a weird song where I just kept adding layers of sounds and sound effects, to cope with reality."



"A Stray Catalyst is a Gesamtkunstwerk project that integrates poetry, music, choreography, videography, and mixed media arts," says Linda Vista-based Saki. The contemporary classical-new music multimedia endeavor began in 2019 as a collection of poetry set to music, recorded at the Mesa College recording studio as an internship assignment. A Stray Catalyst just released the title single and video for an upcoming album, *Solitaire for Two* (due October 20). "This song is about cognitive dissonance, and how that manifests itself in intra-and-interpersonal relationships. The rest of the concept album is similarly themed, in that it presents the musings of someone who nonchalantly evaluates age-old psychological and societal conundrums from an all-too-intellectual standpoint, only to find themselves lost in a labyrinth of second guesses. The video is kind of a queer romance between two characters who presumably represent the heart and the mind. The lyrics go 'The head beats the heart every time they play a game of checkers,' and one of my friends, Scarlet Checkers, is a clowntortionist, and I thought she'd be perfect for this video... the hardest part was finding a venue to record at during lockdown, and what ended up happening was I built the set in my living room from stuff I bought at Home Depot. It's crazy what can be done with a small budget."



PONY DEATH RIDE

"Moving out of San Diego has been a long-term plan and, after considering a few options over the years, including other parts of California, Burlington, Vermont emerged as the clear frontrunner," says Jaye MacAskill of married comedic rock duo Pony Death Ride. "Since leaving Brooklyn in 2003, I've been in San Diego for the past 17 years. I've always felt fortunate to have the opportunity to live in California...for someone who grew up in a small, isolated semi-rural community in Canada, since moving here, I have done so many things, seen so many places, and met so many great people, it just doesn't even seem possible." She says the move wasn't initiated during the pandemic. "So, during the earlier, quieter, gentler, and more innocent pre-Coronavirus part of 2020, we made an offer on a small building just outside Burlington's downtown core, a block from Battery Park and the lakefront. By the time we closed, the Covid lockdown had begun. Originally called Gronan's Store, it's a circa 1880s-1890s corner market with second floor living quarters. After trying to wait out the worst of the Covid epidemic for the past few months in San Diego, we're looking forward to finally heading east and making this charming little building our home and future site of business."



CINDY LEE BERRYHILL

"I'm delighted to announce that a digital single — two new CLB songs, with an accompanying booklet — will be released on Omnivore Recordings in early September, 9/11 to be exact," says Cindy Lee Berryhill. "With myself on guitar and uke, Renata Bratt on cello, violin, and mandolin, David Schwartz on upright bass. Danny Frankel on drums and percussion, and Deane Cote on pedal steel and mandolin." Berryhill first came to prominence on the singer-songwriter scene in 1987 with her acclaimed first album and hit song "Damn, I Wish I Was a Man" ("I'd be sexy with a belly like Jack Nicholson"). Berryhill's tune "When Did Jesus Become a Republican?" spent over a year as a featured track on Neil Young's *Living With War Today* website, where songwriters are encouraged to submit political music. Her husband, noted rock critic and *Crawdaddy* magazine founder Paul Williams, died in 2013, having suffered declining health ever since a 1995 North County bicycle accident. Songs written during that period appeared on her 2016 album *The Adventurist*, which she dedicated to Williams' memory. A reissue program of her earlier albums was launched last year by Omnivore, including new liner notes and bonus tracks, beginning with her *Garage Orchestra* LP.

Pandemic for strings

One of the issues orchestras are facing these days: the health risks associated with brass instruments. You may already know that trumpets, trombones, french horns, and their brass buddies feature "water keys" to drain the accumulated moisture from the instrument. Another term for water key is "spit valve." But the term "spit valve" might be less than accurate. In theory, the fluid being drained isn't spit, but the condensed moisture from the brass player's breath. Either way, when the player hits the water key/spit valve, the fluid drains onto the floor beneath the instrument. That fluid could be seething with COVID-19. Orchestras will need to figure this out.

Meanwhile, a way to achieve safe concertizing might be to focus on string music. Think about it: all the string sections need do is spread out a little bit, as there is no one forcefully expelling

his or her potentially covidladen breath through a violin. In fact, string players could wear masks.

Since string music is clearly safer than music with winds and brass, let's take a look at some music written only for strings. It's the responsible classical musical choice to make

I'm being facetious, of course, but let's explore the idea anyway.

The gold standard for string music is either the Serenade for Strings by Tchaikovsky or the Serenade for Strings by Dvorak. A brief survey of pieces composed "for strings" reveals that these two are clear masterpieces. But the problem with this brief survey is this: string music doesn't always tell you that it is string music.

The most famous string music ever composed is Mozart's Eine Kleine Nachtmusik. You wouldn't know it from the title — which translates to A Little Night

Music — but Fine Kleine Nachtmusik is a serenade for strings. Sorry Tchaikovsky and Dvorak, now Mozart is in the game.

Maybe he already was. Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings is something of an homage to Mozart, according to the composer himself. In the same vein, Edvard Grieg's Holberg Suite is a 19th-century suite for strings based on the 18th century's style of dances. He wrote it to celebrate the 200th Birthday of Dano-Norwegian playwright Ludvig Holberg. The Holberg Suite is another piece that doesn't declare it is for strings only.

Early 20th-century British music produced a load of string music. There are two composers who dominate this genre. One of them, Edward Elgar, tells us that he is writing string music with his Serenade for Strings and Allegro and Introduction for Strings,

both of which are among my favorite compositions of all time.

The other composer, Ralph Vaughan Williams, does not tell us he is writing for just strings in his famous Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis. Record producers used to sneak other pieces by Vaughan Williams, such as The Lark Ascending and Fantasia on Greensleeves, onto records of "English String Music."

The Fantasia on Greensleeves is scored for two flutes, while The Lark Ascending has two flutes, one oboe, two clarinets, two bassoons, two horns, and a triangle. Both these pieces are potential

covid threats and should not be confused with the safer string music in this article.

The last piece I want to mention is a Serenade for Strings by the Czech composer losef Suk. The piece was premiered in 1895. Though a wonderful piece of music, it doesn't quite live up to the Serenade for Strings by his father-in-law and fellow Czech, Dvorak.

Lovers of American classical music will no doubt fault me for omitting Samuel Barber's Adagio for Strings from this study. I have two reasons for doing so. One, I've never liked it much; two, isn't there's enough sadness in world right now?

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Greedy-go-round

hat is it that will ultimately draw the following four characters together: the misfortunate maintenance man at a men's sauna, a crooked customs officer. the resilient boss of a glittery nightspot, and the battered B-girl she takes under her wing? Narcotics? Nope. The other drug: money — in this case, a sizable Louis Vuitton bag stuffed full of it that has passed through more hands

than a cloth napkin. We won't know which of the Beasts Clawing

at Straws stashed the bag in a locker until almost three-quarters of the way through the picture, and the identity of the ultimate beneficiary will remain a mystery until seconds before the curtain shot. That leaves the viewer ample time to try and crack this nifty Korean thriller.

It's while making his nightly rounds that bathhouse custodian Joong-man (Bae Seong-woo) happens across the locker with the loaded valise (stealthily deposited in a silken long take), and he quickly places it in storage, hoping no one will claim it. It must be tough having a boss who's a stickler for promptness, particularly if you're in the habit of being late. Joong-man blames his home life — his wife (Jin Gyeong) wages a daily battle with a demented mother-in-law (Youn Yuhjung) — but the boss will have none of it: the next time he arrives so much as a minute late, Joong-man is on the unemployment line.

Port officer Tae-young (Jung Woo-sung) has a different set of worries, chief among them Mr. Park (Jung Man-sik), a lender-of-last-resort who refuses to take anything which causes him displeasure for an answer. (We arrive at Park's warehouse fishery just in time to witness the body of a previous defaulter being carted off.) Tae-young cries victim, blaming the nonpayment on the MIA girlfriend for whom he cosigned a loan. He's so relieved when Park grants a week's extension that he gives the foreboding goon a friendly nudge, which is rather like trying to thaw an iceberg with a Bic mini. First time director Kim Yong-hoon sets the neo-noir lighting knob in Tae-young's apartment to "expressionistic," thanks to the neon jungle street view that flickers outside his window.

The reason Mi-ran (Shin Hyunbin) works the nightspot won't be spoiled here. Suffice it to say that the illegal immigrant she befriends on the job insists on playing Galahad, and

the diverting Double Indemnity excursion he leads us on is a case of right tire treads, wrong corpse. It's one of several times that Yong-hoon traffics in black comedy while taking us on this amusing greedy-go-round. We're also introduced to her boss, club owner Yeon-hee (Jeon Do-yeon), as an angry customer's slap to the face is met with a beer bottle to his head. She's number one on Mi-ran's speed dial, the one she calls at the first sign

Occasional blasts of gratuitous violence belong in another movie, as do some of the films more reachable moments. A former classmate of Taeyoung's turned cop, and the touchyfeely familiarity he brings to the role, borders on Columbo. And from what I read, Joong-man's mother had much more to do in the novel upon which this is based. There's a touching scene between mother and son towards the picture's close, but other than spewing bile, her sole function here appears to be causing her son to show up late for the job. And given the exposed nature of sitting naked in a pool spa, wouldn't Mi-ran notice the mural-sized shark tattooed on the boss lady's leg before Yeon-hee exited the water?

It will take a good hour for the bouncing time-frame to stabilize (and even longer for the director to remove his Tarantino training wheels). Still, it's a wild, multi-character ride that's rife with energy and style, complexly knotted with an ending as simple as it is satisfying. ★★★★


A Family Affair

continued from page 15 dozen eggs a week while playing water polo. So we went on Facebook Marketplace and found one of our neighbors was getting rid of their chickens, because they were her son's pets, and he was a teenager and had lost interest. So we bought their coop and two chickens." Both were Buff Orpingtons.

Four years later, the Mitchells have four chickens, all of them raised since early chickhood after the two older hens were eaten by coyotes. Two are Buff Orpingtons, and two are Silkies, a "designer" breed with silky plumage, black skin and bones, blue earlobes, and five instead of the usual four toes on each foot.

The Mitchells' fouryear chicken journey has been a bonding experience, Carrie says. "When we got them, we just looked at them as providers of eggs," she says. "We didn't realize they were going to become pets, but then

we named them and, well, they became our pets. I remember being very happy when Lucy appeared to know her name. I'd go out there and yell, 'Lucy,' and she'd come running right up. Then one day she was sitting in her nesting box, laying an egg, and when I shouted 'Lucy' the other chicken came running to me. I thought, 'Son of a bitch! Lucy doesn't know her

name. They just think 'Lucy' means 'food.'"

To fight the smell, Mitchell makes sure the coop is thoroughly cleaned once a week. As for rodents, she says, "We have dogs, so they chase them away."

Shortly after buying their adult hens, the Mitchells added two baby chicks, both Silkies, to their flock: Nugget and Regina. Before long, Carrie Mitchell says, there was a problem.

"We went to this farm in Lakeside and let each of the kids, Jimmy and Julia, pick a baby chick," she recalls. "As they got older, one morning around five, we heard what sounded like a boys' voice screaming in the backyard. We went looking, and there was Nugget, learning to crow."

Cognizant of the ban on roosters, Mitchell says, "we decided to rehome him. Julia was afraid if we give him away, someone would slaughter him and eat him, so after about a month we finally found him a home on a chicken farm in Bonsall. These two very nice people showed up in a Porsche. We still keep in touch. They send me pictures and updates and he's very happy. He's got his hens."

Mitchell isn't alone. From the San Diego Backyard Chickens Facebook page, July 20: "Sally ended up being a Sam. We have a beautiful Brahma rooster (4 months old) that we can't keep in the city. Does anyone want him for breeding? (No killing!) If anyone wants to trade for a Brahma hen, we'd love to do that. We live in San Diego, 92119." The next day: "Thanks everyone, we found a wonderful home for him!"

Most people, the Donnellys and the Mitchells included, raise chickens for their eggs. "A healthy adult hen generally lays up to 300 eggs a year," the city of San Diego says on its "Keeping Chickens" fact sheet, which can be downloaded from its website. "Five hens would supply approximately 30 eggs a week, which would meet the needs of a typical family of four. Backyard eggs contain 25 percent more vitamin E, 33 percent more vitamin A, and





75 percent more beta carotene. Home raising reduces the need for transporting eggs from farm/factory to store to home, resulting in a reduction in carbon emissions and packaging materials."

Joe Donnelly says the eggs are "way better. What you'll notice is the shell is thicker, and the yoke is much richer and deeper in color. When you compare them to store-bought eggs, it's like the difference between a light beer and a really good IPA."

Carrie Mitchell agrees. "They're smaller than store-bought eggs, but they're delicious," she says. "The kids love them, and with no rooster, you don't have to worry about any fertile eggs. It's amazing how many people don't know that hens don't need a rooster around to lay eggs. They just don't understand it."

Normal eggs

At our house, the concept of eating freshly laid eggs is taking a while to catch on.

On our first full day as chicken farmers, I let the four hens out of their coop around 7 am. Two hours later, Hunter goes out to check on them and excitedly runs back in the house with an egg in his hand. "We've got our first egg!" he exclaims. He proceeds to pull out a pan and cracks the egg, along with a second, store-bought one. The yolk from our chicken's egg is a much deeper yellow. Hunter flips the eggs, cooks them to over medium, and then slides them onto his plate. He hesitates. "It's a little weird, knowing where it came from," he says. Two more eggs come

our way soon after, all three grayish in color and slightly smaller than store-bought eggs. They are put into an empty Vons egg carton. My son Conner comes home from work around 9 and wants an egg for his Ramen. "Do we have any normal eggs?" he asks me.

Not for eating

There are two schools of chicken farmers in San Diego County. There are those — like the Donnellys, the Mitchells, and now me — who keep a handful of hens in their backyards to produce eggs. Then there are the chicken farmers in more rural areas who raise larger flocks of fowl to eat.

The groups don't mix, says Richard Maudsley, the founder of the San Diego Backyard Chickens Facebook page. "I launched the page three or four months after my wife and I got our first two chickens because there was very little information geared toward people like us," says Maudsley, who lives in Santee. "There was only a Facebook page for livestock owners, people who raise chickens for consumption. And we're not about that. In fact, either I or our two other administrators have to approve every post, because we've had people who do raise chickens as livestock try to post on our page, and that's not what we're about. We're not going to eat our chickens."

The San Diego Backyard Chickens Facebook page is filled with questions and answers, advice and suggestions. One person says her hen gobbled up one of her earrings and wants to know if it's harmful; several others chime in that the same thing has happened to them but the chickens are fine. "Well it looks like you're gonna have to be walking around with a scooper for a while," reads one response. Chicken owners have



asked questions on how to keep their free-range backyard flocks safe from hawks or owls (aviary netting), how to ventilate a shedturned-coop (cut a hole in the wall and install a vent cover from Home Depot), and how to care for older hens past the laying stage (be careful not to overfeed to prevent fat buildup).

Maudsley began raising chickens four years ago. "The only things my wife eats that comes from animals are eggs and cheese, and we had a neighbor who was moving and had to get rid of her two chickens," he says. "She gave us an extra coop, and we took those two chickens in and really enjoyed the fresh eggs."

Maudsley has had a number of his chickens die over the years. "We've lost a chicken to a dog, one to a raccoon attack, one to ovarian cancer, and one to a bacterial infection," he says. To dispose of the dead chicken body, he says, "you can go to any landfill, although in our case, since two of them died under suspicious circumstances, we sent them to the University of California, Davis for a necropsy. The [Newcastle] quarantine just ended, but researchers still want to keep track of chickens that die. So for \$20, you can send them in and they'll examine them. That's how we found out about the chickens who died because of ovarian cancer and a bacterial infection."

Today, Maudsley says, his backyard flock consists of three hens, and even though he runs the Facebook page for backyard chicken owners, he concedes he has no idea what breed his hens are. "I know it's kind of sad to say for someone who runs a site about backyard chicken farming, but all of our hens were obtained when they were already adults," he says.

A hen named Jet

After one week, the Arnold chickens have laid a total of nine eggs. I also ordered a new coop from Amazon for \$159 that took me three hours to assemble (and gave me a blood blister in the palm of my left hand from a screwdriver), only to find it was too small. I'm sending it back, and am scouring the San Diego Backyard Chickens Facebook page for a used coop.

We have established a routine: I get the chickens up in the morning, letting them out of their coop and bringing them a plate of cut-up apples or vegetables. My wife puts them to bed and sits with them awhile when the sun goes down. A flight attendant, she's named the smallest and most personable one "Jet."

We're still trying to figure out who's going to clean the chicken yard. Stay tuned.

The current owner is a holding company, El Paraiso LLC, which lists the property as its mailing address but states that the home is not occupied by its owners.

The home's current listing, which dates to mid-July, appears to be the first time it's been offered for sale in its current configuration. The listing price of \$8,749,000 remains unchanged to date. ■





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
