

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Bridge over beachy water


While the Del Mar bluffs and NCTD are in the news I feel it is time to introduce some solutions and common sense especially after reading about the absurdly expensive and disruptive idea of moving the railroad tracks inland ("Good-bye, easy walking to Del Mar beach," Neighborhood News, September 28). This idea has been well thought out over time and I'll just give a general overview as an explanation. Everyone will agree that keeping the rail line where it is will be cheaper. Many will agree that it could stay where it is now long term if the problem with the crumbling cliffs can be satisfactorily addressed and fixed. My plan does fix that problem, assuming some parts of the track are safe from the bluff collapse for several decades without serious intervention while other parts need more immediate attention. My way to extend the life of the bluffs and rail line is to relieve the stresses on the bluff under and around the track and to reinforce the bluffs at the same time. The way to do that is to build a bridge over the problem areas. However, it would not be just a conventional bridge, but a 'zero clearance' or 'zero elevation' bridge. The track bed would clear the top of the bluff by just a few inches so that all the loads and stresses from the track and passing trains are eliminated, but from a distance it would appear as before. This bridge would be supported by columns that would have isolation pads that would also minimize vibrations to the bluff.

concrete monoliths that you see under road bridges or trolley overpasses. These columns are an array of tubular steel posts that are driven into the ground under and around the track. The technology and equipment for screwing these long posts into the ground are well established and it is already used to permanently support buildings and landscaping. Something that may appeal to the environmentalists is that all these columns will be quite invisible and the bluffs wouldn't be torn up during installation. As well as supporting the bridge itself, they will reinforce the bluffs in both the stable and unstable areas and therefore extend the life of the bluffs. Think of them as oversized rebar or the fibers in a fiber-reinforced composite. There are no limits to the length of this type of bridge and it could be easily extended if other parts of the bluff continue to erode. The work could be done incrementally using prefabricated structures to minimize the disruption of the rail service. The main advantage of this concept is that if there is a partial continued on page 4

oceanside Fisherman Cacciola catches criticism

Todd Gloria's campaign for mayor has benefitted from a number of donors associated with the 101 Ash Street building, the asbestosridden vacant property that has cost the city so much in both money and reputation. Jason Wood, Steven Black, and Steve Scott have donated \$4950 directly to Gloria's campaign for mayor since 2019 with the last donation in April. All are key players at Cisterra Development, which bought the building from Doug Manchester and Sandor Shapery and then leased it to the city in 2016. ("The seller-landlord, Cisterra, played an outsized role in the city's acquisition of the property," the Hugo Parker LLP report states.) Cisterra isn't new to the donation game: city records show that the company's officers have made at least 100 donations to city candidates and committees in the past 10 years, including \$4100 to Kevin Faulconer's campaign, as well as supporting both Carl DeMaio and Nathan Fletcher in 2012. Lobbying reports show Cisterra reps met with Faulconer about 101 Ash and two other downtown projects in that time period.

Corporation members also donated \$500 to Scott Sherman's near-miss run for mayor, and, in 2016, \$1100 to Barbara Bry's campaign for her current city council seat. In just the past year, they've also donated to city council candidates Stephen Whitburn, District 3 (\$1200); resigned candidate Kelvin Barrios, District 9, (\$2100); and Christopher Ward's run for state assembly, District 78 (\$2000). Cisterra's officers also gave \$6666 to the Downtown San Diego Partnership PAC in February, according to reports filed electronically with the San Diego city clerk. By Reader staff writers

Meanwhile, former city real estate assets employee Cybele Thompson, who resigned August 3, donated \$1350 to Gloria's campaign between February 2019 and the end of June, and hosted fundraising events in March 2019 and June 2020 for the councilmember. Jason Hughes, of Hughes Marino Inc., which advised the city on the building deal, has donated \$2300 to Gloria's mayoral campaign since January 2019. In November 2015, he donated \$4200 to Gloria's campaign for the Assembly seat he will vacate to return to San Diego. Another \$23,675 poured into Gloria's campaign from lobbyists who reported they worked on the 101 Ash deal, including employees of **California Strategies and Ledford Enterprises,** as well as the law firms of Cooley LLP and Sheppard Mullin Richter & Hampton.

What does it all mean? Campaign reform expert Matt Strabone says, "The political system incentivizes and almost requires contributions, whether direct or to independent expenditure committees, Strabone says. "If you want to accomplish anything at city hall, you have to have credibility with decision makers and contributions are how you do that."



UNDER THE RADAR

Self-causa San Diego ex-city councilman **David Alvarez**, whose once-vaunted political career went into a tailspin after his 2013 mayoral loss to **Kevin Faulconer**, has been pulling in a little cash from National City. Following his fall to Faulconer, Alvarez cast about for the next step up the ladder and hit upon the not-so-smart move of running against **Sean Elo** on the board of the San Diego Community College District in 2018. Alvarez announced that he'd quit that position in 2020 if he won a spot on the county Board of Super-

visors. The ploy failed when fellow Democrat Elo, now running for city council against **Kelvin Barrios** — who has frozen his scandal-plagued campaign beat Alvarez handily. Since then, Alvarez has been laboring in local political vineyards, including a stint in April and May on behalf of National City, providing "State of the City Contract Services for COVID-19 work." That's per a May 29 invoice for

\$2400 sent to the city care of National City mayor Alejandra Sotelo-Solis by Alvarez's firm Causa Consulting. Adds the document: "This is the final invoice for the contract to provide services for State of the City related communications. Contract ends June 1. Contract amount was \$4400. Prior payment received was for \$2000. Balance due is \$2400." "For the day of the State of the City, we will be present to capture images and visuals, conduct interviews, capture the Address and publish a live feed," says an undated proposal by Causa. "In order to make sure as many individuals of the public have access to the information delivered at the State of the City, a combination of videos and graphics will be produced over the course of the following months. All public engagement activi-

ties related to this project will be tracked and reported back to the Mayor upon termination of our work. Any additional material that is produced but not utilized will also be submitted."

But plans changed in the wake of the pandemic, Alvarez said in a weekend telephone interview. "Causa Consulting was excited to come on board at the beginning of the month to assist you in communicating the state of the City on various

social media platforms," says an April 1 letter from Alvarez to the mayor. "While we have been able to edit a video and a few messages to post related to your State of the City speech, the current COVID-19 crisis has appropriately shifted your priorities and we are pleased you have asked us to continue working with you in order for you to be able to maintain the community regarding the current State of the City." **Last minute hits** With the beleaguered city council campaign of former **Georgette Gomez** aide Kelvin Barrios called to a halt following a torrent of financial reporting woes, the local development establishment has begun lining up behind his opponent Sean Elo. September 23 saw the registration of a new independent expenditure campaign committee calling itself San Diegans Who Support Integrity In Public Service in Support of Sean Elo for San Diego City Council 2020, identifying its prin-

> cipal officer as registered lobbyist **Rachel Laing**. The filing was dated September 22, the same day of a *Union-Tribune* story headlined, "New discrepancies emerge in Barrios campaign filings."

A September 23 disclosure report shows that **Stephen Cushman**, a wealthy Mission Valley landowner and onetime advisor to GOP mayor **Jerry Sanders**, came up with \$1000

for the new fund on September 17. A separate filing dated the same day shows Cushman donated an additional \$2000. A week later. On September 24, super-rich La Jolla developer **Mark Gleiberman**, chief executive of MG Properties Group, gave \$2000. In October 2016, Gleiberman hosted a high-dollar fundraiser for Democratic presidential hopeful **Hillary Clinton** featuring President **Barack Obama** at his sprawling estate. On October 5, the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce PAC kicked in \$2500.

Meanwhile, **Michael McConnell**, who helped narrowly beat the chamber's long-sought downtown convention center expansion with a flurry of online advertising earlier this year, has put up \$5624 for digital ads against the coun-

cil bid of Barrios, according to a September 30 disclosure filing... More out of town special interest money continues to flow into the campaign for San Diego's Measure A, a proposal to hike property taxes in the city to fund a bevy of bond measures for government-subsidized housing projects. Basis Architecture and Consulting of San Rafael gave \$3500 on September 25. The same day, BNBuilders of Seattle, Washington contributed

\$5000. Closer to home, on October 5, Atlantis Group Land Use Consultants gave \$1000 and Pacific Southwest CDC came up with \$2000; both list an address in San Diego.

collapse even under the track, movements of the train traffic above would be unhindered as it was not supporting the track in the first place. 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stemming from accusations of unfulfilled promises after a competing businessman took control of the 40-year-old building built by the late sportsfishing entrepreneur Dick Helgren. Helgren built the two-story A-frame building in the late '70s to house his Helgren's Sportsfishing business. His son Joey ran the business after Dick passed away in 2008 at age 75.

But in 2016, the city sent out a request for proposal for a new sportfishing business at 315 Harbor Drive South; though the elder Helgren built the building, the city of Oceanside had a legal right to assume ownership and reassign its lease when the family's lease was up. The 2400-square-foot, two-story building and several prime boat slips were awarded to a different longtime Oceanside Harbor local, Joe Cacciola, owner/operator of Sea Star Charters. He renamed the building Oceanside Sea Center. Helgren's Sportfishing was allowed to move to a smaller space in the Coast Guard

out in a contract, but that its educational value was "definitely used as a selling point." For his part, Cacciola says the aquarium, located on the first floor of the Sea Center along with fishing supplies and gift store

"In my opinion, the Sea Center has been an excellent addition to the harbor and our visitors. I've not had one complaint about their operation or level of service."

Auxiliary building, and both Helgren's fourvessel fleet and Cacciola's five-vessel fleet now take fishermen out daily to catch yellowtail and bluefin tuna, though there are fewer passengers aboard these days due to covid-19,

So what did Cacciola promise to the city of Oceanside to wrest the A-frame away from the Helgren family? "When the Sea Center proposal came before us, Joe was pushing so hard for the aquarium," says Carolyn Krammer, a member of the Harbor and Beaches Advisory Committee. "He was saying the Sea Center was going to be this big education and information center with this great aquarium. I was wondering how you could have a big aquarium in such a small building like that." (Cacciola, four years ago: "Not all visi-

tors want to go sportsfishing. We hope to serve other people's needs.") A visit to the Sea Center reveals a 15-foot long, unlit, sparse aquarium housing a shovel nose shark, two starfish, and two other species hiding out of sight. Krammer says the Sea Center's aquarium specifics were not spelled items for sale, is a work in progress. He says that other saltwater species will be added in three or four weeks, and that aquarium lights will eventually be installed.

When Cacciola promoted his Sea Center master plan to the city in 2016, he also said

it would house the Pfleger Institute of Environmental Research (P.I.E.R.) which currently occupies the second story of the Sea Center. A promotional video says that the Pfleger Institute oversees studies on sea bass movements, and does research in order to find a better, "less destructive" way to catch swordfish. "We hope to continue this work and expand the educational component." The spokesman in the video explains that education will be, "the cornerstone of the [Oceanside] Sea Center," and that Pfleger will offer floating classrooms and seminars. A call to Pfleger's Sea Center office was not returned, and no one was in the office when I stopped by, even though the P.I.E.R. website lists six employees.

Longtime Oceanside locals will remember when the Pfleger Institute was connected with a controversial plan to build a much larger aquarium in 1998. That plan got the support of the Oceanside City Council but was met with a wave of negative public reaction. "They wanted to pave over sandy beach at the North Jetty harbor beach for this aquarium," says Shari Mackin,

who, along with Krammer, successfully fought against the proposal. "We have a beautiful sandy beach. Can you imagine the council said we had too much sand?" The proposal died when the California Coastal Commission, which happened to be meeting in Oceanside at the time, denied it. Cacciola, who promoted Pfleger's 1998 aquarium plan, says it was derailed when, "the surfing crowd, Surfrider, and very local people," rebelled against it. He says the manmade North and South Jetties actually increased the harbor

beach to three- or four-times its original, natural size.

One Sea Center detractor who opted to not be named says Cacciola made another promise four years ago. "He got in front of the city council and said he was bringing down this beautiful 75-foot boat to be part of his new fleet. He did bring it down. It's called the *Southern Cal* and it's been sitting there for three years. It never went anywhere." Cacciola admits that his *Southern Cal* sportsfisher craft has not left its dock since it was brought down to the Oceanside harbor. But he says a technician continues to work on rewiring its faulty electrical system. And he says he has greatly upgraded the old Helgren's A-frame building. "There was no working water or sewer service before we took it over. They had stopped up the sewer pipes with rags. There was a terrible smell."

Ted Schiafone, Oceanside's Harbor Division manager, says Cacciola has made "major improvements" to the Helgren's building, "above and beyond what was required in the lease. In my opinion, the Sea Center has been an excellent addition to the harbor and our visitors. I've not had one complaint about their operation or level of service."

DOWNTOWN **101 negotiations** Who pays if Ash catches fire?

The city has stopped paying rent on 101 Ash Street, but the asbestos-riddled building has sat empty for months, which poses a new problem. Vacant buildings are at high risk of vandalism, fire, and theft, and the city has dropped it from property management services. The city's contract with CBRE, Inc. to manage 101 Ash Street, 1200 Third Avenue (CCP) and 201 A Street (King Chavez School) is up for renewal, but on September 15, the city council made a change to the terms of the agreement, dropping Ash Street and raising questions about the city's liability in the event of a loss. All of the buildings have lease-to-own agreements that require the city to hire a third-party property management company. The city chose CBRE, which had managed 1200 Third Avenue and 201 A Street for over 25 years when the lease began in 2015. Three years later, 101 Ash Street was added. "We are still in possession of the building although not physically occupying it," said deputy chief operating officer Erik Caldwell. If a fire broke out or a pipe burst in the night, "we would still need to respond." And if something happened while the property management agreement was in place, the liability would fall on CBRE, Caldwell said.

But the company had threatened to drop services for all three buildings if Ash were removed, or if the city didn't agree to "spread the cost" for managing just the two properties. Council president pro-tem Barbara Bry, who made the motion to drop Ash — and the full cost of its management — called CBRE's response "blackmail." Ash Street's share of the contract was about *continued on page 8*

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\$311,000, which Karen Johnson, asset manager for the city's real estate department, said would keep two building engineers on site, maintain the systems, and provide 24/7 security. "Even though Ash is vacant," Johnson said, it's important to maintain property management to protect it, "regardless of what we ultimately end up doing with that building." Security is critical with an empty building, "particularly a large one in the middle of downtown, an easy target, she said. "The homeless population could easily get into it."

Sanna Singer, assistant city attorney, reminded the council of another risk in excluding it — a breach of the lease requirement for a third party property manager. That, in turn, could affect insurance on the former Sempra Energy headquarters, which now needs an estimated \$115 million in repairs. Claudia Castillo de Muro, the deputy director of risk management, said the property is covered by Prism, the joint powers authority that provides insurance for most of the city's portfolio. In 2018, the property committee adopted a vacant building best practices policy to limit losses

to empty buildings, which de Muro said are "uniquely susceptible to perils such as fire, vandalism, and theft." The policy requires members to conduct periodic inspections, secure the perimeter, and address maintenance issues. "Failure to adhere to vacant building policy could jeopardize coverage," she said.

Councilmember Scott Sherman asked if city staff could take over any of the functions handled by CBRE. Caldwell said they were trying to determine if the security company used by CBRE could be hired. But there's still the monitoring of the systems. "It would take several weeks at best for our existing city forces to learn those systems and be able to operate them."

In support of the motion, councilmember Ward noted that they had already breached the contract on the toxic building by refusing to pay rent to landlord Cisterra Development starting September 1, as decided by Mayor Kevin Faulconer. Councilmember Vivian Moreno agreed, calling property management services in the situation "a frivolous waste of taxpayer dollars."

On September 28, the council approved the amended contract for one year, with a reduced amount for managing the other two buildings not to exceed \$539,000. Councilmembers Chris Cate, Jen Campbell, and Scott Sherman were opposed. "I have been worried since the last vote that perhaps the city's insurance coverage on 101 Ash would not be in place" without a third-party management company, Campbell said. The building is insured and will continue to be insured, de Muro replied. "The impact rests with the property being vacant." If there's a loss, the joint powers authority can summon inspections and the property committee which governs coverage - can decide to modify coverage. "They could point out that the city is not in compliance with best practices, change valuation to actual cash value or flat out exclude coverage altogether." SHEILA PELL

"Measure A on the San Diego ballot would allow the city to issue up to \$900 million in bonds — paid off by an increase in property taxes that lasts. incredibly, until 2068 — to build subsidized housing for poor people and the homeless." noted the U-T editorialists. "Given that such housing costs on average more than \$400,000 per unit — and that only a small percentage of the needy would actually get shelter if the measure passed — this is an extravagantly expensive and underwhelming approach to a problem that has much cheaper solutions." An August poll published by the newspaper reported 🖞 36 percent of the electorate in favor and 32 percent against, woeful numbers for any measure hoping to get above the daunting twothirds threshold.

eight years ago, according to a February 2, 2012 account by the Inland Vallev Dailv Bulletin. "Last year, National CORE was part of a far-reaching investigation by the FBI. which raided the Rancho **Cucamonga office** as well as the homes of a former state senator and four defendants in a San Bernardino County corruption probe," the story relates. "Among the defendants raided was developer Jeff Burum, who co-founded National CORE in 1991 but resigned from the board in 2010." Of the action. a National Core executive told the Bulletin. "we were not its focus." In the summer of 2017.

a San Bernardino superior court jury acquitted Burum of all charges in the so-called Colonies cor-

ruption case. According to an August 29, 2017, San Bernardino Sun account. "Prosecutors alleged Burum paid \$400,000 in political contributions to the three defendants and former Board of Supervisors Chairman Bill Postmus, who later entered a plea bargain with prosecutors and testified at the Colonies trial. The money, investigators alleged, [was] actually bribes or payments for delivering the settlement," the newspaper reported. "Prosecutors said the bribes were disguised as contributions by Colonies Partners to political action committees secretly controlled by the defendants or members of their staffs. Jurors said afterward prosecutors failed to convince them that any of the charges against the defendants passed the 'beyond a reasonable doubt' test." After his acquittal, Burum returned to National CORE, where he remains the non-compensated chairman of the board, according to disclosure filings.

The nonprofit's San Diego projects include San Ysidro Senior Village, "with 51 beautiful apartment homes for seniors, ages 55 or better, who are experiencing homelessness," says the company website. "Nestled along San Ysidro Boulevard, this stunning community is in a walkable. mixed-use. transit-oriented neighborhood, conveniently located next to a high-frequency bus line and less than a mile from the Beyer Boulevard **Trolley Station.**"

San Diego city campaign disclosure filings show that John Seymour, vice president of acquisitions for National Core, has given a total of \$6345 to city campaigns since 2013, including \$250 to Todd Gloria's mayoral effort on September 27 of this year.

What happens when all the world's a stage?

Just under a year ago, I was given the honor of working as the *Reader*'s theater critic. For a while, I joked that God was so horrified at the prospect that he killed the entire industry just to stop me. But I don't make that joke any more, because it's not that funny if the part about killing the industry is true.

After giving me five months to get my bearings, the editors were set to feature my review of La Jolla Playhouse's *Fly* on the March 19 cover. But on March 12, the Playhouse suspended all performances. Scrambling, I emailed San Diego Rep; *House of Joy* was still slated to play that evening, so we still had a show to review. An hour later, it wasn't and we didn't. The Old Globe shut down the same day.

The Old Globe emailed last week: Artistic Director Barry Edelstein explaining the theatrical tradition of The Ghost Light. "Every theatre has one. When the show is done and everyone has left the building, a bulb on stage is left burning" — for safety reasons, or to light the way for the ghosts of actors past, take your pick. Continued a grateful but still pleading Edelstein, "You are keeping the lights on — even if it's just a ghost light — during this great intermission."

"This great intermission" — that's a lyrical and perhaps kind way to put it. During that intermission, local theaters are scrambling to reinvent themselves online. The Globe offers a plethora of engagements, both educational and performative. La Jolla Playhouse has five new digital Without Walls shows, including a dance/poetry film, a spoken word piece, and a radio horror series. San Diego Rep just livestreamed *Get Happy: Angela Ingersoll Sings Judy Garland*. Diversionary Theater is offering free streams of *AmeriQueer*, an "online streaming audiocast of new plays." This week, Vinson Cunningham published

a piece in *The New Yorker* about how audiences are adapting to the age of virtual theater; San Diego seems to be keeping pace with New York in that department. But Cunningham also noted

that "in the theatre, each ticket buyer plays a role. The quality of our attention—silent or ecstatic, galled or bored — is a kind of freestanding, always improvising character, and makes each in-person performance unrepeatable. Call it the congregational art, and remember how you once practiced it: it has something to do with location, and feeling, and your invisible relationship with individual performers and the whole panoply of action on the stage."

Amen. And while that relationship is invisible, it's anything but intangible. What's theater got that movies ain't? The energy in the room. It's hard to imagine that energy animating a socially distanced space. It's even harder to imagine the gray heads that usually make up most of the audience feeling eager to pack a house in a post-covid world, vaccine or no vaccine. Theater people are famously creative; they'll find ways tell their stories. But I'm curious (not to say anxious) to see what happens now that the audience is no longer captive.


Never meet your heroes

I started writing for the *Reader* 25 years ago; Joseph Mitchell is one of the big reasons why I wanted to do so. The summer before my senior year of college, I visited Thidwick's Books in Ithaca, New York and happened upon a used copy of *Up in the Old Hotel*, accurate." Jill Lepore said otherwise, too. Lepore is a professor of history at Harvard and a prolific author. In 2015, she published her own lengthy profile of Gould in *The New Yorker*, one that paid more attention to the man's mental illness: his obsession with race (he stalked a black sculptress in the name of love and seethed against Jews), his sexual misbehavior, his institutionalization and likely eventual lobotomy. She wrote that while Gould was in the asylum, he was visited by two *Harvard Crimson* writers. "They reported, 'One of these days, someone is going to write an

a collection of Mitchell's long, beguiling, quote-laden, and detail-rich profiles for *The New Yorker* magazine. The fist was a portrait of McSorley's Saloon from 1940; the last, Mitchell's second profile of a New York eccentric named Joe Gould, dated 1964. In the author's note at the outset, dated 1992, Mitchell wrote, "*Joe Gould's Secret* is factual." He wrote the same of his first Gould profile, *Professor Sea Gull*, written in 1942.

Joe Gould said otherwise; he wrote a friend that *Sea Gull* was "about ten per cent

article on Joseph Ferdinand Gould '11 for the *Reader's Digest.* It will be entitled "The Most Unforgettable Character I Have Met," and it will present Joe Gould as an unusual but lovable old man. Joe Gould is not a lovable old man." They were right about the last bit, but they got the title and the publication wrong.

"Joe Gould's Secret is a defense of invention," Lepore wrote, either oblivious or uncaring as to the way my journalistic guts were spilling all over the floor. "Mitchell took something that wasn't beautiful, the

sorry fate of a broken man, and made it beautiful — a fable about art. *Joe Gould's Secret* is the best story many people have ever read. Its truth is, in a Keatsian sense, its beauty; it's beauty, truth." Lovely and accurate, except there's that stubborn word from the author in 1992: *factual*. The word that won me over to this whole doomed and glorious weekly newspaper business. I believed Mitchell had found his man and shown him whole. More fool me.

Mitchell's fable about art concerns Gould's Oral History, an attempt to paint a picture of the times by recording the way people talked in those times -much like Mitchell himself. Gould said, "In time to come, people may read Gould's Oral *History* to see what went wrong with us, the way we read Gibbon's Decline and Fall to see what went wrong with the Romans." Mitchell wrote that the *History* never existed; later, he found out that it did. He made no correction. He published nothing further, except maybe for that fateful, painful Author's Note.

Recent editorial helps illumine shady past

In February of 2007, Herb Klein, the Union-Tribune's retired editor-in-chief and longtime aide to Richard Nixon, sat down in San Diego for one last oral history for the Nixon presidential library. Klein would die at age 91 on July 2, 2009, but during his final interview, **Professor David Greenberg of Rutgers University and Nixon** presidential library director **Timothy Naftali elicited a** series of details regarding Klein's time as reporter and editor for the Copley Press and his simultaneous years of service for Nixon. Klein was part of a Cold War generation of U-T employees known by the company as "Copleymen" for their dedication to owner Jim Copley, famous for bragging that the influence of his San Diego newspapers had thrown **California to Richard Nixon**

in 1960's presidential race against John F. Kennedy. In a front-page "public apology" last month, U-T editor Jeff Light blasted his dead predecessors, noting that the Copley Press (which the editor did not explicitly name) had "for decades carried political functionaries on its payroll and a partisan worldview on its news pages. It is not easy to accept responsibility," continued Light. "But I think the people of San Diego should know that at the Union-Tribune, we feel the weight of the painful chapters in our company's story. We are sorry for the times the company has let down our community. It motivates us to do better."

Though Klein is not around for rebuttal, he left behind thousands of pages in the Nixon library and at the University of Southern California, his alma mater, documenting an earlier era of American political life. The collections show a more nuanced Klein, and

how he accommodated Copley and the future president during the years of confrontation with the Soviet Union. As the 2020 campaign tumbles toward an uncertain finish, his memories of the Nixon-Kennedy debates, the first to be televised, shed perspective on how American politics functioned sixty years ago.

"He'd given me strict instructions to avoid the debates," Klein remembered of Nixon's orders after Kennedy became the Democratic standard-bearer in the summer of 1960. "So after we got the nomination in Chicago, he had a press conference and said he announced that he was going to debate, and the most surprised person in the room was me." Klein speculated that Nixon had changed his mind because "he felt he could debate anyone, and if he avoided the debates, he would be hounded by it by the hostile press. It's one of the interesting things that's in today's politics versus then," he said, describing the take-no-prisoners attitude of today's campaigns versus the negotiations that led to the four 1960 debates. "The Kennedy people and ourselves were all good friends, and we would fight and argue and then have drinks together."


According to Klein, Nixon's fate was almost immediately sealed when the campaign miscalculated that the fourth debate would be most-watched and prepared accordingly. "Our strength was the debate that would be on international relations, so we agreed to have the first one on domestic policy. And the second and third would be on general questions, and the fourth would be on international relations. And that was a mistake, because a big audience was there to see, out of curiosity, what was a debate like. So the biggest audience was for the first time, and then Nixon's weakness [showed] in that first debate, besides the things that have been said about make-up and that was that he was trying to be too polite again. He was afraid of the 'Tricky Dick' thing."

Nixon's "planning was thrown off because of the fact that he had been ill. And so while he was in the hospital, he had to learn how to say a lot of medical terms and describe -- what his illness was -- thrombophlebitis. Anyway, he was sort of scratching to get out and get on the campaign, and so that instead of taking the whole day off on the day of the debates, we flew in to Chicago, and we spoke to the Carpenters Union, which eventually supported him." But while Kennedy would "have his staff fire questions at him" by way of preparation, said Klein, "Nixon's would be to isolate himself and study the book and prepare the issues."

Nixon was reluctant to confront Kennedy in front of a live audience. "He wanted me to be sure continued on page 41

The only time I was ever really happy was as a boy, surfing the waves at Malibu. — John Paul Getty


hile there is no straight road to happiness, I learned early on what would *not* lead there. My grandfather, Jose, first taught me that lesson. He laughed at everything from bug spray to funerals as if all the sadness circuits in his brain had been blown when the train ran him over and left that deep dent in his forehead. It was either that or the shots of tequila he regularly took directly from the bottle that led to the headwaters of his joy.

Lesson two occurred a few years later while poring over a copy of Life Magazine with my father. He was a working-class, happy man; laughing as he often did while pausing at a full-page photo of a grey-faced, grey-haired man in a grey suit. "That's John Paul Getty, the richest man in the world," he said, without a tinge of jealousy. In my child's mind, I reasoned that my dad had a grey suit that looked exactly like Getty's, but that Dad was laughing while J.P. was frowning. As he would do all his life, my old man imparted wisdom without using words. From him, I learned that money does not buy happiness.

For the rest of my life, I've remained convinced that happiness was not found in excessive amounts of money or any other material substance. I have found happiness, lost it, and found it again in unexpected places.

Now for a little joy-sucking science from *Healthline.com*: "Happiness occurs with the release of dopamine and serotonin, two types of

Don't let anyone rob you of that happiness. A great laugh is a natural high, but, sadly, I don't hear as much outrageous laughter as I used to.

"Another thing that leads to happiness is what I call 'divine appointments.' All day long I run into people in need of emotional assistance. Spending time with them can pull them out of a slump, while giving them and me great joy. If you think about it, you probably encounter the same sorts of opportunities daily in your own life. You know how you'll be thinking of someone and they suddenly appear? When that happens, pay attention, act on it, and watch what unfolds. We may only have a couple hundred months left in our lives



on earth, so why not live them in happiness?"

If nothing else works, Trickey might turn to Beavis & Butthead reruns or some other equally silly pursuit to fill up the joy tank. According to him, "I don't see any reason why we as adults can't enjoy the same happiness we did as kids. Why do we have to be so serious about everything? But you need to know where to look for happiness. The greatest laughter can come from the dumbest sources, so don't ignore it. It's medicine for our heads and hearts. And, if you genuinely care for mankind, you will want to share some of that joy and happiness with them. When you do, you'll receive it back. Music, a phone call to a friend, or looking at an old photograph can trigger spontaneous happiness through the memories of good times you've shared with various people.

"For the most part, happiness is a choice. That's not to say you will always be happy, but when you're in a rut, try something different to break you free. There will always be circumstances that can bring you down, but you can usually bust out of them with a little creative effort. I'm not suggesting being reckless. Reckless abandon can lead to severe injury or even death."

Having split his 54 years between the U.S. and Australia, Trickey considers Australians to have an edge in the happiness department. According to him, "I think Australians are a little more carefree with their 'no worries, mate' attitude. For the most part, Aussies work to live, not live to work."

Trickey is a highly sought-after fitness and wellness trainer. "Seeing people grow into better versions of themselves brings me great joy," he says. "People can go through some dark periods, and maybe you're in their life to let them know they will again experience joy and happiness while helping them get through that tough time.

"Nobody has the right to take your happiness from you, and I sometimes worry about kids who are being robbed of happiness by being told that the only way they can be happy is to go against the system, to find something wrong with traditions that have been in place for centuries and knock it all down. Blaming others is actually a way of stealing your happiness. Frustration, violence, retaliation, and intimidation are poisonous. Conversely, exercise, friendship, watching and playing sports, music, getting in the ocean after a long day all contribute to happiness. But sometimes, happiness is as unexpected as someone farting in a church. Then, everybody laughs.

"Bringing people together is a big high for me. It's about being content with what we have. Getting a new truck, house, boat—that's all good, but happiness comes from being grateful for what you have."

Smile, it no broke your face

So said a Hawaiian T-shirt popular in the mid-'90s. Hawaii-bornand-raised Akoni Apana is a picture of happiness whose wisdom has earned him the nickname, "the Hawaiian Yoda." He is a self-taught wellness practitioner who has incorporated Shiatsu and Lomi Lomi into his own method he calls Hawaiian Power Flow. His clients claim relief from maladies

Entering Apana's office, I feel a sense of peace and joy accentuated by the Hawaiian music playing softly in the background. "Hawaiian music is happy music," he says, "and I play it, or the Hawaiian chants that help empower the Hawaiian culture, 24 hours a day. I see a lot of patients from all walks of life and I find that many of them are unhappy because they are seeking, and don't know what they want or need. I help them if they ask for my help. I try to teach them to observe without becoming attached, and to let go. A man recently cut in front of me when I was in line to get gas. I honked at him, but he just went ahead like he was privileged. I filled

up, let it go, and drove away happy while he was angry after having trouble with his credit cards. Instant Karma! People like that have issues in the body that are making them upset with life. They have pain somewhere.

"I watch the news

every day and see the possibility of a civil war coming. It doesn't have to be, but regardless of what happens, I continue on my mission to help and to serve people. When I die, my mission is complete. That's why I'm not afraid.

"I don't practice any

your stress.

"Growing up in Hawaii, I rarely heard a Hawaiian say they wanted to own a lot of things. Part of the Hawaiian culture is humility, and they know they don't need a lot to be happy. Maybe that's why they live longer.

"I teach by example. If I try to make someone do something they don't want to do, it takes away their identity. That's identity theft. We have to appreciate what we have at the moment and when the moment has passed, let others remain in their identity. I tell my clients who are going through difficulties that it's temporary. The next day they're usually out of pain. People can create drama out of nothing, and if you get into it, they will have to win. If you walk away, they forget what they are arguing about. I have everything I need and I'm grateful for it every day. Because of that, I go beyond happiness to contentment. Happiness can come and go, but when vou're content and you know you have everything, you're happy all the time. I maintain my contentment, people see that, and they want to be content too. It's beyond earthly comprehension.

"Recently, I applied for a grant to help people who can't afford my services. I didn't get the grant, but instead received unemployment and used that as my grant money. Now, I can help people who need me despite them not being able to pay. Another thing that can help people become happy is not to pay attention to their age. Age is just a number.

"A lot of people fly from the Mainland, get a hotel room, and spend thousands in Hawaii to learn Ho'oponopono. It means conflict resolution, and all it is is letting go of the conflict. If someone is angry and can't be influenced by my actions, I walk away and let somebody else put up the fight. I've learned that whenever conflict comes into your life, go around it if you can, or resolve it as soon as possible.

"Everybody has a mission, and when we pass away, our mission is complete. My mission *continued on page 40*



October's Lowest Tides, coinciding with afternoon hours several days in a row, usher in several months of excellent tidepooling opportunities to come. A -0.7 foot tide occurs at 4:27 p.m. on the 17th; a -0.8 foot tide occurs at 5:17 p.m. on the 18th; and a -0.6 foot tide occurs at 6:13 p.m. on the 19th. The region's best-known places to view intertidal life include Cabrillo National Monument and areas up the coast from La Jolla.

The Tawny Hues of the Black Oak Tree are just beginning to highlight the slopes of San Diego County's higher mountains. Named for the dark coloring of its bark, especially when wet, the black oak is the only deciduous oak native to the county. Associating with pines, firs, cedars, various evergreen oaks, and occasionally chaparral, the black oak lends a true autumn coloring to the Cuyamaca, Laguna, and Palomar mountains.

Mars comes to opposition on October 13th. All week it is still essentially at its closest to Earth, remaining 22.5 to 22.0 arcseconds in apparent diameter. This is bigger that we will see it again until September 2035.

Mars is climbing into good view a little earlier every night. In late dusk it glares fiery orange, brighter even than Jupiter, low in the east. It's high in the southeast by 10 or 11 p.m. daylight-saving time, and it's its highest at its telescopic best by midnight or 1 a.m., blazing in the south.



Kensington Brewing finally brewing in Kensington

It took nearly eight years and the impact of a pandemic, but Kensington Brewing Company now officially brews beer in its namesake neighborhood.

Founded in 2012, the nanobrewery spent years quietly making beer in Grantville warehouses, distributing small quantities to restaurants and shops in and around Kensington. By 2015, founders Zack Knipe and Andy Rogers built out a small tasting room to host customers in their Grantville brewery. Three years ago, they finally met the promise of their beer company's name by opening a neighborhood taproom at 4067

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Adams Avenue, in the heart of the community. Though they ultimately stopped serving beers

in Grantville, brewing operations continued at that location. But that changed this spring, with the arrival of the novel coronavirus.

When the shutdown began in March, Kensington put all its beers in cans, and its founders found themselves planning for an uncertain future. "We really thought critically about the pandemic and its potential to last a long time," says Knipe. "We made the decision, if we were going to shut down, we needed to get small."

The timing was right for the change: Kensington's Grantville lease expired in May. They applied to the ABC to license their taproom for brewing, and moved the three-barrel operation to the back of the shop.

That's just about the time breweries were allowed to resume serving beer, provided they also served food. Kensington's timing was fortunate again. While many San Diego breweries have had to scramble to team up with restaurants and food trucks to satisfy this requirement, Kensington had already spent much of last year working to install a restaurant component in its taproom: Detroit-style pizza maker Angry Petes.

"We had already done the little kitchen build out, the health department had approved," says

Business Association, Kensington Brewing has been able to add sidewalk seating out front, supported by pizza slices and whole pies. The reduced capacity means sales are down, and the venue now closes on Mondays and Tuesdays for Knipe's cousin and head brewer, Jeremy Knipe, to brew and can beers.

obador," says the hand-painted sign beside me. It gives a phone number. This is on Logan Avenue. I'm

standing in the line, as you always do here. Yes, even in these tough times, Las Cuatro Milpas ("The Four Cornfields"), is still hauling 'em in. OK, line's a little anemic compared with PC (Pre-Covid). Still mostly anglos, like always. I notice they haven't put tables and chairs outside.

One reason I'm here is I know they give good deals, and right now I'm a little tight o'budget.

"Only 2 Go," says the hand-drawn sign scrawled on the stickered door. Thousands of stickers, from "Working Class Coffee" to "Slappy's Garage." One's a combo of the US and Mexican flags: "We the people," it says. "Together we stand."

Finally get inside.

"Yo tengo hambre!" says the lady from among the bubbling pots and fryers. She's deep-frying rolled tacos and tortillas. "I'm hungry!" All the other counter ladies laugh. "Have a tortilla!" says one.

Now it's my turn. The three ladies are waiting for me to decide. It should be simple. I swear the

pegboard wall menu hasn't changed in the five years since I was last here. Except an "L" is missing from the word "Tamales." Maybe prices have inched up, but only a little.

"Rice and beans," it says, "\$3.50, \$4.50; rice and bean and tamale, \$5.75; chorizo con huevo, \$4.00, \$5.75, \$9.75. Burritos, \$5.50."

Saturdays, they have menudo (\$4.00, \$5.75, \$9.75), but that's about it. "Cash Only," it still says. Bili and Leticia the counter ladies wait. So does Manuela at the cash register. Oh yes. I remember her from last time. Looks as if she has never shifted from her chair. She's a granddaughter of Petra and Nati, who opened this place in 1933. They look down from their portraits on the wall.

Meanwhile, I'm checking. Not sure about the sizes, so I order two: rice and beans, small, and chorizo con huevo, also small. The ladies snap into



action. They scoop, pluck, wrap, stuff into plastic bags, and assemble it all in a cut-off carton. "Rice and beans, \$3.50!" calls Bili to Manuela.

"Chorizo con huevo, \$4!"

calls Leticia. Manuela enters the info and hands me a slip for \$7.50. I pass over a Hamilton. "How hard has it been since covid?" I ask Manuela.

"A little bit," she says. "We have to wrap everything in plastic. It costs more money. It takes twice as long per customer. And people can't eat here any more. But our customers keep coming. Still 80 percent white people! They come to the barrio from the courts, from the city government downtown, from police HQ. But we may have to raise prices next year."

A little further down Logan Avenue, a couple of people have sat down on the ledges at the base of La Luz Del Mundo church. They have opened up their boxes, unfolded their tortillas, and are having at it right there. I almost join them, but then decide to cross Cesar Chavez to Chicano Park under the bridge. They have green grass there, and tables. I head past the mural on the bridge leg that says "Varrio Si, Yonkes No!" (Which doesn't mean "Yankees no;" it means "Junkyards no.")

> When I get into the park, I see tables painted in the colors of the Mexican flag. One's free. I drop my box on it, look at what I've got. And wow, there's a lot. The two polystyrene containers are packed to the lid, one with beans and rice, the other with chorizo and egg and rice. Then there's squishedup paper twists of fresh chopped onions and cilantro, other wraps of big, fried flour tortillas, two per person. Man, this is a lot. Actually, this is too much for one person to handle.

I hear a dog whine. I look up, and there, on a red tartan rug laid

on the green grass, is this lady with a black pup. Part pit, I'm thinking. She's tossing some dog biscuits into a bowl. "Agora! Wait!" She's hanging on to it by the collar. "Sixteen months old. She's getting to be a lot to handle."

Huh. I suddenly think. I've touched the chorizo, but not the rice and beans. "Would you like this?" I ask the lady. Name's Darlene. I hold up the container.

"Sure," she says. "I'll eat it."

I bring it over. "Agora!" she says, and holds the pup back while I set everything down. Because there's the rice and beans, the toasted tortillas, the hot sauce, the onions and cilantro.

Darlene leans over and starts mixing her food up. "I'm always here. I sleep down by the last pylon. Then I'm up here. People know me." I go back to the table, start plowing into the

chorizo. I mean yes, mild, but its umami comes out when you add the beautiful, dark-red house hot sauce. Specially with the nicely burned tortilla, it all brings out the chorizo flavor. And it works well with the cold coffee I've been hauling around.

So we chomp on in a kind of covid-distanced companionship under these awesome bridge legs, and somehow the traffic above and around us doesn't intrude on this green oasis. It's nice. And luckily, Agora doesn't get jealous. She just settles down to sleep. But what gets me: this entire, filling meal I'm eating cost...four bucks!

And Darlene's was \$3.50. And filling? I swear, how do you beat that? Honestly, why would I eat anywhere else? OK, you might get a little tired of chorizo and rice and beans after ten days, but what a back-up!

I get up to go, then remember to ask. "Do you

But not so fast. Though the crew working it was new to me, they insisted Seafood la 57 has the same food and ownership people have lined up for all these years. A few months back, someone in the Ocean 97 truck told me change was coming — some sort of buyout or split I think it was. But these guys tell me the change is mainly about establishing a more modern, social mediafriendly brand.

At any rate, my fried and grilled fish tacos were the same as they've ever been, and kept that lovely \$1.80 apiece value price. They still offered that seafood stew, and the menu still featured the likes





of smoked marlin and octopus.

Aside from the name and paint job, the biggest change I noticed was an increase in the variety of ceviches available. I tried a new, tropical fish ceviche - made so with little chunks of mango — and found it to be the most satisfying ceviche I've tried this side of the pandemic. It washes down nicely with a serving of coconut juice served in a cup with the carved flesh left inside the shell with optional tajín. The truck is pushing its "Tostada Loca," a mountain of a dish topped with shrimp, octopus, oysters, and more.

Online, I've seen a few commenters hate on Seafood la 57, assuming it was an entirely new business ruining a good thing. Others have been more pointed in their complaints, claiming this truck doesn't properly devein the shrimp in its *aguachile*.

I can't speak to that, personally, and maybe it's a new crew finding its legs. The batter of my fried fish taco was a little soggier than normal, but I've come to expect occasional inconsistency from this high-volume truck. But it tasted just as I expected, and my grilled taco was right on the money. Hopefully, that's a sign Seafood La 57 will rise to the food truck stature of those that came before it.

The Wise Ox picks up where Heart & Trotter left off

Wise Ox; 2855 El Cajon Boulevard #1, North Park. I remember the day, back in 2015, when the Heart & Trotter brought whole animal butchery to North Park. There was an aura of excitement around its revival of the neighborhood butcher shop. This summer, when I learned its founders, James Holtslag and Trey Nichols, had sold the business, I worried the community was losing something special.

Turns out they've left the shop in great hands. First of all, they sold it to friend and chef Brad Wise, and his partners at Trust Restaurant Group. Wise tells me that an early concept for the Trust restaurant included housing the Heart & Trotter butcher shop *inside* the restaurant. While that didn't materialize, Trust did turn to Wise's butcher friends for ingredients, including leftover bones to create stocks.

These days, the Trust group has grown to include several interlocking concepts, includ-

ing Italian bake shop Cardellino, which supplies breads to its sister restaurants. Likewise, its newly acquired butcher shop can now fulfill the promise of supplying upscale meat and charcuterie for the group.

After briefly closing the butcher shop in August, Trust reopened it with a new name, The Wise Ox. Not a ton has changed: there's still a meat case filled with the likes of local pork and grass-fed beef, as well as house-made sausages. There's still a smoker and Santa Maria grill outside, the shop still provides offal and other organs to the owners of (spoiled) dogs, and its counter still serves burgers and daily sandwiches, including roast beef, turkey, and a house pastrami.

What changes have been made are subtle: there are new sausage recipes at work, a different take on pastrami, Cardellino-made pastas, ice cream, and wine for sale. There's a dry cooler that displays the likes of prime tomahawk ribeye en route to 40 days of aging. Some of these steaks are served at Trust's Mission Hill restaurant, Fort Oak. Others have been pre-ordered by discerning customers, including one gentleman who recently had the wherewithal to order three able BBQ chops learned at Charelston's Lewis Barbecue, purveyor of the best brisket made outside of Texas. Wise says future weekend events will highlight some of Sharpe's BBQ skills. While I've enjoyed the shop's new pastrami sandwich — made on fresh marble rye plus a couple of tasty sausages from the case, you can be I will hightail it back to The Wise Ox soon to report on Sharpe's work with that smoker.

Charles McPherson, with his daughter Camille, says, "It's very hard to come up with a fresh melody that isn't banal or pedestrian."

Saxophone icon Charles McPherson unveiled his latest album Jazz Dance Suites on his own Chazz Mack Music label on September 24. It's his 30th effort as a leader.

The album is dedicated to his ballet-star daughter Camille, and the music was originally the result of a collaboration between McPherson and the San Diego Ballet's artistic director Javier Velasco.

It turns out that the composition process for this session was quite distinct from the typical jazz recording. "Well, it is a little different," explains McPherson, "because I'm accustomed to writing for instruments in the traditional setting. Writing for dance involves being very careful about the structure. The musicians get to improvise in certain areas, but the dancers are not improvising ever. They're listening for certain cues they need to hear. So you have to be very definite with the tempos when you are writing longer forms. There is such a thing as too fast, you know? But it's hard to be too slow."

non-melodic, but you have to dig deep for a melody that's new and original."

The new album features a mix of New York heavyweights (it was recorded at the Van Gelder Studio in New Jersey) with long-time pianist Randy Porter and San Diego vocalist Lorraine Theresa. The opening suite "Song of Songs," is based on the Old Testament story Song of Solomon.

"I kind of knew the Bible version," McPherson commented. "The one thing that really comes across is that it's about unrequited love. A young woman is in love with King Solomon — but it never materializes. So I needed a female voice, obviously, and Lorraine has a gorgeous timbre, you know? She's not a belter, she isn't going to blow the walls down. She has a very delicate, beautiful sound. I heard her in my head when I was writing it, and I knew her voice would work."

Thousands of classic jazz records were recorded at Van Gelder Studio, and McPherson's new album has a singular, almost golden sound quality to it. "A lot of people think this is the best sound I've ever gotten on a record. I recorded in the main room along with the bass and piano, and I didn't use headphones, which I don't like anyway. Everything about that room is designed

for the sound to be wonderful. So I didn't need to use any electronics or anything."

McPherson's wife Lynn co-wrote two of the tunes and acted as artist management alongside myriad other

responsibilities. I was curious as to why they chose to self-release, rather than shop for a label. $\frac{1}{2}$ It turns out that the project was just too personal to turn it over to an outside party.

"It's a legacy project," she said. "We felt that Charles was going to be leaving this really to Camille. All of this music was composed for and inspired by Camille. And we wanted to really,

really, do it right — not give up control to anybody else. And we're really glad we did it that way, because we got to do everything exactly the way we wanted.

"We did have some help in the form of a wonderful sponsor, (executive producer) Joann Clark. She underwrites the Jazz Series at the San Diego Ballet, and she put in a nice chunk of money, because she wanted it done right as well. She's a huge jazz fan and a huge fan of Charles. So it was great to have her on board."

I asked Wanicur about what prompted his return. "The gigs are just starting to emerge, very slowly - mostly do-it-yourself type situations. It's been over six months since Covid-19 shut everything down. Now we have to provide our own venue, and the San Diego Underground was already a kind of DIY gig.

"The virus just killed the music scene. And it seemed like it would be a good time to have a jam session just for people to hang out and play. So we were looking for a place that's outdoors."

So did he have any problem putting together a band, under the circumstances?

"Not really. I mean some people can't afford to take a risk, and I completely understand that. But people haven't been too busy, so it wasn't hard. People want to play. I've been lucky because I've been able to do some streaming gigs, so it wasn't like I hadn't played in six months. It was great to be able to have some fun and have a communal type experience playing music in the sun."

How did you make it safe? "Well, the first line of

defense is it's outdoors in a very breezy area. People sat in small groups distanced from each other. For the musicians, everyone brought their own instruments. We also had disinfecting wipes for the piano. The rhythm section set up really far apart from each other, almost as if we're on a huge stage. I did that so that any people who came to sit in would not be bunched up in the same area."

Did it feel like a success to you?

"It did. This was the first one, and we had a large listening crowd of probably 40 to 50 people who were not musi-

Jewel Kilcher was a teenager when she began working on the songs that ended up on her debut full-length *Pieces of You*, which features live 1994 recordings from the Inner Change coffeehouse in Pacific Beach, as well as studio tracks completed at Neil Young's facilities. Though it failed to chart in 1995, it began picking up steam and has now sold over ten million copies. She's gone on to release a number of albums, including a sojourn into country music, a children's CD and picture book, and a greatest hits package with new recordings of two songs: one co-written with local Rugburn Steve Poltz, "You Were Meant For Me" (featuring the Pistol Annies), and "Foolish Games" (with Kelly Clarkson). She once portrayed country music legend June Carter Cash in a Lifetime network TV movie. Besides hosting TV talent shows, and she's written a poetry book and a personal memoir. *Pieces of You* will get a 25th anniversary edition four-disc box CD set full of unreleased music, including more Inner Change coffeehouse recordings. The November 20 online release concert features guest Steve Poltz, as she performs the entire album for the first time. A previously unreleased demo version of "You Were Meant for Me" is available to stream and download.



STEVE POLTZ

Jewel's former flame and songwriting collaborator Steve Poltz is best known from the Rugburns, of "Hitchhiker Joe" fame. He released his first solo album with Mercury Records in 1998 and went on to create his own label, 98 Pounder Records, as well as becoming one of the co-owners of the Starlight Lounge near Mission Hills. His many collaborators include Glenn Tilbrook of Squeeze, with whom he has both toured and recorded. A while back, Poltz recorded a new duet version of the song he wrote with Jewel, "You Were Meant For Me," with Spain-based singer Soledad Vélez, produced by six-time Grammy Award winner Chris Goldsmith (Charlie Musselwhite, Aaron Neville). His last full-length, his Red House Records debut *Shine On*, was recorded in his new home city, Nashville, where "Sharon and I got married a couple days ago," reported Poltz earlier this year. Having survived a tornado near Nashville, Poltz and his wife came back to San Diego this past summer to spend time with his widowed 90 year-old dad. His new animated lyric video for "Quarantine Blues" features a song recorded in Jason Mraz's home studio (Mraz plays organ), with local star Jeff Berkley (Berkley Hart) producing.



WILLIE KELLOGG

Drummer Willie Kellogg played a huge role in the early development of San Diego indie bands in the 1960s. Among the many groups he played with were a latter day version of the Outcasts, a popular pop/R&B ensemble featuring future Union Gap frontman Gary Puckett which served as the house band at the Quad Room in Clairemont for around two years. His most celebrated group, Five Pound Grin (previously known as the Survivors), was a 1960s garage rock band known for playing teenage dances and schools before graduating to local rock clubs. They released two now-celebrated singles, including "Never Hurt Again," which resurfaced on the compilation *The Incredible Expanding Universe of Brain Shadows Volumes One & Two.* The group later evolved into Pale Fire, which released two singles in 1968 on the Lyrics' label Feather Records. He appears on three tracks of the just-released compilation *Look Out! The San Diego Scene* 1958-1973 (with Five Pound Grin, Steve & the Holidays, and Joel Scott Hill & the Invaders), plus he was the favored on-call drummer for the Strangers and Joel Semper's Kingsmen. Kellogg, who also played with Bob Mosely and Mosely's group Moby Grape, passed away at the end of September.



THE DRABS

Formed in Carlsbad circa 2005, the Drabs are an indie rock band based in North County led by composer, guitarist, and lead vocalist David Bernat. The group's catalog of original compositions were initially worked up during practice sessions at original drummer Scotty Myers' backyard shed, with guest players dropping in such as Noah Sugarman (500 Miles to Memphis) and Chris Torres (the Grass Heat, Kris Allen Band). Demos for four early songs were tracked at Sven Erik-Seaholm's home based studio in 2006, and then circulated as hand labeled, numbered CD-R copies. The band's debut full length LP Ponto features nine original tracks recorded primarily at Big Fish Studio in Encinitas by Ben Moore, who also contributed Hammond B3 organ to the session. Matt Pivetti (the Richter) guested on backing vocals. A holiday themed EP entitled *Here Comes the Joy* was released in 2015 featuring four original tracks mostly recorded at local Signature Sound Studios by Moore. Guest musicians A.J. Croce (piano) and Gayle Skidmore (vocals) contributed to those sessions. "The Drabs are prepping a new full length LP release," says Bernat. "We're currently in studio with Ben Moore doing the recording at Singing Serpent."



The Doorman: Ruby's a gem

er super powers extend far beyond those of the mild-mannered gatekeeper whose job it is to flag cabs or sign for packages. Look! Up in the vestibule! It's a guard! It's a greeter! It's Doorman! Ruby Rose makes her first big screen ascent since controversially relinquishing the role of TV's Batwoman. Was it worth swapping out a cape and cowl for *The Doorman*'s red midi coat and complementary

bellman's hat? Allow me to get those bags while you read.

Rose stars as Ali, a gunnery sergeant who joins the Marines to clear her head of sordid memories; she's still stinging from an affair with her late sister's husband. After a routine assignment in Bucharest leaves two dead (through no fault of her own), Ali hangs up her dog tags and silver star. Once back home, destitute, dependable Uncle Pat (Philip Whitchurch) hooks her up with the titular gig in an ancient New York apartment building in sore need of repair. It's Easter weekend, and a complete renovation is just a few days away. Only two families are left occupying the space: a stroke victim and his wife and, you guessed it, brother-in-law Jon (Rupert Evans) and his children, young Lily (Kíla Lord Cassidy) and Max (Julian Feder).

Add to that a fortune in stolen paintings safely stashed in the rafters of Jon's unit, and suddenly, it's raining tropes.

Only Victor Dubois (an eminently perturbable Jean Reno) knows what treasures the walls contain. A criminal mastermind steeped in taste and conviction, Dubois' appreciation of classical music and fine art is surpassed only by

MOVIES the exasperation that overtakes him as he watches his underpaid assemblage of safecrackers and

hired muscle succumb to death by incompetence. Even Borz (Aksel Hennie), Dubois' inside (door)man and second in command, never fails to impress with his ability to distress. In return, the otherwise eloquent Dubois treats him like an animal, barking, "Down, Borz! It's okay," as if training an attack dog. Assuming the loot is hidden in the old folk's home, Borz thinks nothing when Ali asks to spend Easter dinner with her niece, nephew, and cuckold. There's a good chuckle to be had when news of a onewoman strike force in Apt. 10C is countered with a patronizing, "It's just a girl. It's nothing to worry about."

Shithouse — If homesick college freshman Alex (Cooper Raiff) spent as much time looking for companionship as he did telephonically complaining to his mom and sis about the lack thereof (or telepathically seeking comfort and advice from a plush dog), he'd be the most popular boy on campus. Jonesing for Maggie (Dylan Gelula), his dorm's RA, doesn't hurt Alex until the fateful night that a drunken party at the eponymous residence hall draws them together. Our cast of characters spend the first third of Shithouse gleefully shitfaced. (Logan Miller puts his own unique spin on roommate Sam, his generation's toasted answer to Jeff Spicoli.) What happens when the girl of your dreams caps an idyllic initial encounter by spending the next few weeks (months?) denying your existence? Or worse, hooking up with someone else? Viewers will have no recourse

but to laugh uncomfortably along while trying to cushion the pain of shared memory that the film tenderly evokes. In Alex, first-time writerdirector Raiff unveils what is appreciably one of the sincerest, most credibly confused teen characters to come down the pike in some time. Even when the dialogue scenes go on too long, there is comfort in knowing that much of what comes out of these character's mouths crackles with authenticity. Alas, a postscript made me wish the film had ended with a swipe right at the 94-minute mark; the concluding minutes add redundancy to this otherwise crisply-paced and trustworthy romantic comedy. 2020 — S.M. ★★★

Questionable Judgment

Ukraine International Airlines has banned a traveler from all future flights with the carrier after the unidentified woman opened an emergency door on a Boeing 737 and went for a walk on the wing as it was waiting at a gate at Boryspil International Airport in Kyiv. CNN reported the passenger had traveled from Antalya, Turkey, with her husband and children in the Aug. 31 incident, when other passengers heard her say she was "too hot" before she popped open the emergency exit and went outside. The airline criticized her for setting an inadequate "parental example" and threatened she may face "an exceptionally high financial penalty." Airport security and doctors on the scene determined she was "not under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs."

Oops!

An octogenarian in the village of Parcoul-Chenaud, France, set off a violent explosion in his attempt to kill an annoying fly, the BBC reported in early September. Not realizing a gas canister in his home was leaking, the man used an electric fly swatter to battle the insect and caused an explosion that destroyed his kitchen and damaged the roof of his home. While the man was mostly unharmed, he has had to move to a local campsite while his family makes repairs to the home.

Collections

- September 22 marked the 60th anniversary of the day 14-year-old Boy Scout Steve Jenne scored a special memento of then-Vice President Richard Nixon's campaign visit to Jenne's hometown of Sullivan, Illinois. Nixon took a bite of a buffalo barbecue sandwich that day, then set it down. "I looked around and thought, 'If no one else was going to take it, I am going to take it," Jenne told the *Herald & Review*, and the leftover has been in a glass jar in Jenne's freezer ever since. In 1988, word of the sandwich earned Jenne a spot on *The Tonight Show With Johnny Carson* and led to his acquiring half-eaten items from Carson and fellow guest Steve Martin, as well as Tiny Tim and Henny Youngman.

Government in Action

- The Opa-Locka (Florida) City Commission voted 4-1 on Sept. 9 to repeal a 13-yearold ordinance that made wearing saggy pants a crime, the *Miami Herald* reported. Around town, visitors can see signs reading, "No ifs, ands or butts ... It's the city law!" and showing two young men with low-riding waistbands, but Vice Mayor Chris Davis explained: "I felt it disproportionately affected a certain segment of our population, which is young African American men." The ACLU of Florida agreed.

Frontiers of Farming

- Cockroach farms are not new in China, where the bugs have long been used in Chinese medicine, but a new facility near the eastern city of Jinan is gaining attention as a way to deal with food waste while producing organic protein supplements for animal feeds. In four industrial-sized hangars, Australia's ABC News reported, rows of shelves are filled with food waste collected from restaurants through an elaborate system of pipes. A moat filled with roach-eating fish surrounds each building to keep the roaches from escaping. "In total there are 1 billion cockroaches," farm manager Yin Diansong said. "Every day they can eat 50 tonnes of kitchen waste." Said project director Li Yanrong, "If we can farm cockroaches on a large scale, we can provide protein that benefits the entire ecological cycle."

Inexplicable

- Jimmy Senda of Racine, Wisconsin, takes a walk along the beach on Lake Michigan every morning, where he collects "sea glass and random stuff -- because I like to do artwork at home with the stuff that I find," he told FOX6. On Sept. 15, he came across a curious package, wrapped in aluminum foil, and around it, it had a pink rubber band," he said. "Curiosity got to me, so I popped it open and it looked like a chicken breast," but on closer inspection, he determined, "it was a brain." The package also contained flowers and paper with what appear to be Mandarin characters printed on it. Senda called police, who turned the package over to the Racine County Medical Examiner's Office and later announced the brain was "not consistent with a human brain," although they were still trying to determine what kind of animal it came from.

Great Art!

 Three years ago, Emma Aldenryd, 18, of Aarhus, Denmark, discovered she had a rare condition called dermatographia, which causes her skin to temporarily swell up when touched. *Oddity Central* reports that the teen has decided to use her skin as a canvas on which she traces artwork with a pencil and posts the images to Instagram. "I started by drawing quite random stuff like a bunch of words," Aldenryd said. "Lots of people question whether it hurts, but my dermatographia has never hurt." Antihistamines treat the itch associated with her condition – but they also stop the swelling, so she doesn't take them.

Wait, What?

- Villas Las Estrellas is a small settlement of about 100 people on King George Island in Antarctica with a school, a bank, a church and even a souvenir shop, but if you want to live there, you and your family -- including your children -- will be required to have your appendixes removed before you arrive. The reason, Medium reports, has a logic grounded in history: The town has a small clinic, but not always a surgeon, and the nearest hospital is more than 600 miles away and difficult to reach. In 1961, Russian explorer and surgeon Leonid Rogozov at the similarly isolated Novolazarevskaya Station suffered life-threatening acute appendicitis and was forced to operate on himself -- without anesthesia. The two-hour operation was successful, and Rogozov returned to work two weeks later.

When I help someone by getting them out of their problems, it gives me great contentment. I don't feel any difference between when I'm working and when I'm not working. My work is my mission and my hobby. I don't play sports, because if I get hurt, who's going to fix me?"

Solo road trips

Jillian Bourdon is a teacher of philosophy, psychology, and yoga at the Grauer School in Encinitas, and she may be the happiest person I've ever met. She finds happiness in places where most people fail to look, sometimes on solo road trips,

in learning something new, or simply in the less adventurous, often ironic tidbits life presents daily. Says Jillian, "Our last name is Bourdon, and I only recently found out that it means bumblebee. Just thinking about that makes me happy. Another thing from my upbringing is that I was born in Fall River, Massachusetts. That's where Lizzie Borden was from. Our last name is spelled differently from hers, but it's pronounced the same, and my middle name is Elizabeth, which can be shorted to Lizzy. So, my parents named me after an axe murderer."

After a hearty laugh, Bourdon continues, "When I go on a road trip, I usually go alone and don't plan much of anything. The last time, I had no definite destination, and only an idea of where I wanted to end up. I practiced manifesting, saying things out loud like, 'I'm gonna find a campground this evening. When I did, I ended up at a site at just the time I wanted to arrive there. When I first arrived, a German man approached me and started talking, which was great because the first thing I try to do when I get to a new place is make an ally so I feel safe. Once I had a buddy, I had everything I needed.

"When I set out, all I knew was that I wanted to end up somewhere near Mount Shasta. I had a book that listed 2300 campgrounds, and I would open it, point to a place, and see if I ended up there around a certain time. Living that way makes every day a mystery — what am I going to eat, who am I going to meet, where will I end up? While that has led to great happiness, I don't think I could live that way full time. Being on the road alone, you don't protect yourself from the pain and discomfort like you normally would; you're just kind of open and raw.

"Having an idea of what you think happiness is can actually get in the way of happiness. Happiness is what happens, and I think there's a relationship between the words happiness and

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happen. I think happiness is what's left when you strip away all expectations. That's not always the case, but I think it creates conditions that can lead to happiness. Other conditions leading to happiness for me are good relationships, doing things for friends, having a nice work/life balance where there's ample extra time, and having hobbies.

"I remember being really happy when my roommate and I got a free piano on Craiglist. During covid, I've been practicing blues scales on it. But moving a piano is not that fun. My roommate's boyfriend is a trained pianist, and after we put the piano on a trailer, we rode around Ocean Beach with him playing it, and that made all of us and some other people watching really happy!" As she says this, her voice cracks with an expression of happiness.

"Good food can create the condition for happiness. Food that is light and leaves no trace. Again, it's a clearing away of excess that leaves only happiness. I think there's some difference between happiness and joy. Happiness kind of infers a transient state, where joy does not. Can you be happy when vou're sad? I don't know, but I think you can have joy and sadness at the same time since joy is more of a backdrop for other emotions.

"I reread 'Song of Myself' by Walt Whitman often. I think of it as a holy book. Whitman says if he dies, he will do it with joy; if it happens then or 10 years from then, he will be equally happy. I have heard that everyone has a set point of happiness and they adjust to their circumstances. I've thought about that a lot over the years and I've made an effort to increase my happiness set point. For example, I once had a job with a great group of coworkers. We loved each other so much and had such good times together that I would leave work so happy that I was uncomfortable. I remember trying to go to sleep at night, and not liking the feeling, but telling myself it was okay to feel that happy. I don't know where that came from, but it was like my wires needed to be upgraded to handle more energy. Now I can handle it, and I don't need to sabotage my happiness. That's why I like the idea of happiness being a shedding thing, not an adding on thing."

was that there was no big audience in the studio, because he felt he did better isolated with Kennedy and not having people applauding or tempted to be applauding. "So we had the press in one area of the studios in Chicago, and the debate actually took place in isolation with seven pool reporters, and so that was the way we went into the thing. And so he only really spent the afternoon really concentrating deeply on it. And I think he obviously underestimated it. But he could answer any question. The bigger problem was he was trying to be too polite."

Nixon was famously obsessed with not wearing make-up. "The reason that he didn't want cake make-up was because when Humphrey had debated Kennedy in Wisconsin, Humphrey had appeared with too much make-up on, and

Nixon felt that made him look like a sissy. And so Nixon's macho was part of why he didn't want to cover his beard much."

In an era without instant polling and focus groups, the immediate outcome of the first debate on September 26, 1960, was uncertain. "Nixon went over to his hotel, and he was dead tired and went right to bed. And I talked to him for a few minutes, and Rose Mary Woods did, and I and my staff went back to do our first big job of spinning. The only way we finally found out who had won was by crowds the next day. Ken-

nedy had a big increase in crowds, and we had a decrease. And of course you know the story about radio and TV, that Nixon won on radio and Kennedy on TV. We put our big emphasis on the fourth debate, and Nixon in the polls showed that Nixon won the fourth debate by about 4 percent, I think. It was a sizable margin, which helped us in our final swing to gain votes in the last 48 or 72 hours. So we probably made the biggest gain, I believe, in the final 72 hours that any candidate has in that period of time."

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
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
